



Die Another Day

On the joys of creating, despite the hostile storms and vicious seas

"A phrase is born into the world good and bad at the same time. The secret rests in the barely perceptible turn. The lever must lie in one's hand and get warm. It must be turned once. and no more." – Isaac Babel, "Guy de Maupassant," translated by David McDuff

It is ironic, perhaps, that two of my all-time favorite short story writers were two of the most careful wordsmiths in all literature. But perhaps not. I am given to gushing torrents of words, tumbling one upon another, rushing forward. Any attempt at nuance usually involves stacking adjectives rather than any kind of paring down. There is no implied or insistedupon connection between artists one admires and one's own work. Still, the minimalist abundance found in the writing of Russian short story writer Isaac Babel and American hardboiled-detective innovator Dashiell Hammett, in which more is achieved through less, is completely absent in my work.

Outside of literary circles, Hammett is undoubtedly the better known of the two, both because his novels The Thin Man and The Maltese Falcon are still so widely read and because his works have been adapted into other forms of popular culture. The many screen adaptations of The Thin Man and The Maltese Falcon, not to mention radio and TV variants, are well known. Still, it is fair to say that Hammett's first novel, Red Harvest, is the literary patriarch of the Yojimbo – A Fistful of Dollars – Last Man Standing cinematic bloodline. The Glass Key is not only one of the best American political novels but was filmed twice, as well as being the unacknowledged blueprint for the Coen brothers' Miller's Crossing. All of this does not even begin to discuss his literary influence on both detective and mainstream fiction

In some ways, Isaac Babel is perhaps one of the very small handful of the greatest masters of the short story. Best known for Red Cavalry, a collection of stories about riding with the Red Cavalry during the bloody Russian Civil War. A bookish, literary Odessa Jew riding with the notoriously violent and ruthless Cossacks would have resulted in interesting prose in any case; Babel's poetic yet oddly objective sensitivity and his

determination to offer evocative reports rather than moralistic essays result in the collection being one of the great works of world literature. Babel also wrote short stories about his life. about Jews in Odessa, and about the Jewish underworld, as well as plays and screenplays.

Stalin came to power in about 1924, although what we think of as Stalinist oppression didn't kick into high gear until the end of that decade. As his art form in an oppressive and repressive era, with Stalin very much controlling Soviet culture by the Thirties, Babel chose silence. This was a quite conscious choice, as he made clear at the first congress of the Union of Soviet Writers (1934), stating that he was becoming "the master of a new literary genre, the genre of silence."

Incredibly, he managed to survive almost through the 1930s. In the first part of the decade, his close relationship with writer and editor Maxim Gorky protected him. According to many sources, after Gorky died under very questionable circumstances in 1936, this protection continued because of his affair with the wife of the brutal and infamous NKVD boss, Nikolai Yezhov. Eventually, Yezhov was thrown out. In 1939, Babel was arrested, tried, and found guilty; he was executed in 1940. There are official Soviet sources that state he was alive until mid-1941, but those are questionable.

So where is this all going? Why, in this first issue of 2008, am I writing about these two great writers? The whole relationship between publication and reader is at best quite complicated and almost impossible to figure out. Some of the interactions are obvious, some intentionally planned, and others absolutely predictable, but many are unspoken and often unconscious. Hostile and condescending responses are often preordained, regardless of what we publish. Readers' reactions to the words printed and ideas expressed are not only to what is really there, as well as what is implied, but also often simply use them as a catalyst to react with long-formed opinions/ideas. There is not a straight line between readers and printed words, nor is there even one between a single reader and unique groups of words. The relationship is always complex, always multileveled, always as much subjective as objective, as much if not more about the disconnection between one's perception and the other's intention.

The truth, or maybe it should be a truth, or even only my perception, is that there are secrets to this relationship. Easily the greatest ones have to do with the pleasures and joys of creating, despite the hostile storms and vicious seas. In this web, where motion and growth continue, hidden by the density of assumed strands by those who consume these works, there is no guide greater than Isaac Babel. Being who I am, how I think, and how I move when the motion is with words, I couldn't write about Babel without bringing up Hammett, but here the unspoken riddles of the oracle are best answered by

There is little question that the Red Cavalry collection is Babel's enduring masterpiece, but many of his other collected stories are no lower in stature. There is none that comes without recommendation, but a few stand out. I really doubt that a full week has gone by since we first started publishing The Austin Chronicle that I have not thought of Babel's story "Guy de Maupassant." I first read it quite feverishly during rides while hitchhiking from Putney, Vt., to Boston, Mass. Drivers who picked me up must have found it more than a bit rude that I barely said hello before plunging back into the trade paperback I was reading, trying to get through as much of the story as I could during each ride.

The story was a blessing and a hymn; it welcomed me into a certain plane of maturity, while clearly indicating how ill-formed so many of my aesthetic conceits were. During these rides, on a cool spring day, I was gifted with those experiences that come from great art, especially when the moment of the encounter finds it in near-perfect tone, resonating with one's life.

"In November I was offered the post of clerk at the Obukhov steelworks, not a bad job, which carried with it exemption from military service.

"I declined to become a clerk.

"Even at that time - twenty years old - I said to myself: better to go hungry, to go to prison, to be a tramp, than to sit at an office desk ten hours a day. There is no particular daring in this vow, but I have not broken it and shall not do so. The wisdom of my grandfathers sat in my head: we are born for the pleasure of work, fighting, love, we are born for that and for nothing else." – Isaac Babel, "Guy de Maupassant," translated by David McDuff

The secret is joy! The truth is creative productivity and reasonable optimism. The lie is hopeless despair and cheap, petty existentialism – the kind that comes candy-bar-wrapped at less than a dollar each. The darkness is laziness; the anguish is lack of imagination; those darkest feelings are the silliest of dreams and not the reality all too many pretend they are. It is not all sunshine and light; progressivism doesn't spring up from the soil like Technicolor flowers. In the best of times there is great difficulty, and in the worst of times nothing is more difficult than belief. But who ever promised it would be different? What

More to the Story

Dear Editor.

My neighbor Corinne Irwin, officed formerly in Austin Community College Room 221, left there in 2002 after a settlement that's subject to a silence agreement ["Return to ACC's Room 221," News, Dec. 21]. News pieces about her triggered a deadline for W.T. Bryant, the subsequent Room 221 occupant, to bring or not bring legal action. He and others did, in 2003. It fizzled, with little learned.

Recently, ACC planned to reopen Room 221. It was unclear whether that meant plain renovation or also remediation. Previous work on overlying third-floor areas had released mercury vapor when flooring was ripped up, according to a 2005 Internet summary. It was abated but without details on what was found in or done to Room 221 below - that summary portion being minimalist, a seeming public relations effort, absent data. Recall that in 2001 when health officials were scheduled to test Room 221 for mercury vapor, ACC compromised test protocols beforehand by spraying sealant in cavities between the two floors. Explanations, including a spurious claim of belated concern for Bryant, contained ACC story holes that American-Statesman reporter Kevin Carmody rebutted (Jan. 2, 2002).

I met Corinne after she relocated to UT. She becomes enlisted - helping friends, being consulted, despite personal disadvantage - when ACC mercury issues recur. Recent enlistment produced ideas - which others, including myself, likewise helping a friend, assisted in framing of what an open records request might clarify. The eventual request contents and responses, however, are unknown except to the requester. the Chronicle, and ACC, Lee Nichols, whom I know and respect (we're both track fans), has written a very competent article, but much is going on, there's another lawsuit, and Corinne by no means is choreographing events. She prefers others to choreograph, contaminants to be eliminated, everybody to be better informed, and she and her doctors left to focus on her own toxicological situation.

Do any of us regret her vote for Tom Craddick? Yes. Will she take orders from us? No. Does she take orders from Craddick? Hell no. One vote only.



Brvce's Response **Was an Overreaction**

Robert Bryce, in his reply to my letter "Postmarks," Dec. 21] about his article ["If More CO2 Is Bad ... Then What." News. Dec. 7], took it as an attack on his character for me to point out that he went from being an agnostic about global warming at the beginning of his article to being a believer in global warming at the end of it.

Now, when people come along and pretend to be skeptical about the science when, in fact, what they really believe is that global warming is going on right now and that it would be wrong to try to stop it, we are not necessarily dealing with a flaw in the writer's character. It could just be fuzzy thinking.

I am inclined toward the fuzzy-thinking theory, because Bryce additionally muddies the water by pretending that global warming is unstoppable, which, if true, means he is wasting his time writing articles opposing our doing anything about it.

But as far as I can tell from his article and his reply to me, his real point is that it would be an injustice to the Chinese to deprive them of American levels of SUV ownership. This seems to me to be quite a misguided equity argument, and it unwisely assumes that there

is any real prospect of the Third World achieving the same percentage of two-car garages as we have, much less that it would improve their well-being and happiness.

I'd like to suggest that there are far more compelling moral issues. There is good evidence that global warming may be a multifaceted disaster for the world and possibly even more of a catastrophe for the Third World than for the first. For but one of many looming difficulties, if the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's regional models are at all correct, we are looking at many areas of the planet becoming far less favorable for agriculture than at present, without the prospect of new areas of virgin farmland turning into replacement breadbaskets. This means that widespread famine can become an issue by the end of this century, on a scale previously unknown in human history.

He invites us to look at the facts. I certainly agree. We could begin by becoming familiar with the IPCC reports, which I must say do not support his Panglossian view of what we are looking at down the road.







Northcross Wal-Mart Fight Update

In between poker tournaments in Las Vegas last week, your morally dissolute correspondent attempted to contact the major players in the Responsible Growth for Northcross lawsuit. I was only successful in reaching Jason Meeker, communications chair for RG4N. In its suit, RG4N asserted the city of Austin did not follow its own rules in approving Lincoln Property's site plan to build a Wal-Mart on the former Northcross Mall property; in her Dec. 21 decision, District Court Judge Orlinda Naranio ruled in favor of the city. A notable feature of her decision was that, despite the fact the suit relied on four major claims, Naranjo only addressed the charge that the proposed Wal-Mart's garden center did not meet the proper zoning regulations.

Asked what went wrong with the case, Meeker replied, "The main thing that was wrong was that we had to go to court in the first place."

But he said the court loss does not signal the end of the anti-Wal-Mart fight, "We are exactly where we were a year ago," he said. "There is a development with a city-approved site plan. We lost in court, and that hurts. We have not lost in the court of public opinion, and it's up to our group and citizens to get together and organize and continue to protest what we see as irresponsible development. It could be argued by others that we



have not pushed a very high-profile battle in the court of public opinion, but we were concentrating on funding our court battle. We still have many options available. In particular, there is [a City Council] election five months away. We are looking very closely at the options available to us regarding the election and how we can leverage popular support to either stopping or getting more meaningful concessions."

Of course, one way RG4N might "leverage support" is by electing Meeker to City Council: he has made noises about challenging Place 1 incumbent Lee Leffingwell. "I'm pretty certain I'm going to run," Meeker said. "The verdict didn't have a consequence one way or the other on my decision." He said he's been holding off on officially throwing his hat into the ring because, "I've been trying to prioritize what's best for RG4N, in that I had to work, and the

verdict was the only concentration I wanted to have, and I didn't want to muddy that with a council run."

TAKING THE CAPITOL OUT OF CAPITAL METRO

If 9/11 established anything, it's that airplanes are al Qaeda's preferred method of travel - not the city bus. But that won't prevent Rick Perry from surging against those sleeper cells on



Perry issued an otherwise unremarkable press release last week, "Security Upgrades to Begin on Capitol Grounds," a boilerplate act of security theatre opening with the phrase "Since the 9/11 attacks." The changes direct all vehicles to enter the Capitol from 15th Street - a moot point for the public at best, since only legislators are allowed to motor onto the grounds. But buried toward the bottom is the announcement, "the state is working with Capital Metro to address relocation of their bus stop on 11th Street adjacent to the Capitol Grounds," for those nebulous security worries. It's never good to imply your constituency is "with the terrorists" so it's probably a good thing no Republicans ride the bus.

Cap Metro's Capitol hub is one of the agency's most-trafficked and highest-profile bus stops, serving thousands of passengers across a multitude of bus lines. Moving the stop in less than a year - per the governor's demand - will be yet another headache for the embattled agency. Yet, as the stop sits on state land, the agency and the city may have to take their lumps. Apparently the Perrys' remodeling of the Governor's Mansion is more extensive than first thought. In her letter of protest to the guv, American Civil Liberties Union Central Texas Chapter President Debbie Russell puts it succinctly:

"Instead of spending gobs of money and time fighting to move Austin's oldest public transportation center, confusing and inconveniencing 1,500 people a day, negatively affecting our public transportation system, so you can avoid being bothered by working-class Austinites' comings and going ... in the name of 'security' ... here's an option for you:

Use the west gate to walk home." - Wells Dunbar Posted Friday, Dec. 28.

he promises will be a historic smackdown. In response to a proposed ordinance change to be considered by the council on Jan. 17, Thomas "Hollywood" Henderson, the former Dallas Cowboy and Texas Lottery tycoon, is circulating an angry petition in Central East Austin to fight the proposal, which on Dec. 11 was recommended 7-0 by the Planning Commission. If adopted by the council, the change would tighten restrictions on new house sizes for any Central East Austin lots smaller than 5,750 square feet. The current ordinance - aka McMansion - restricts new houses to 2,300 square feet or 40% of the overall lot

size; the proposed change would allow only the 40% calculation on smaller lots, within a rough boundary of I-35 and Chicon, from MLK to Seventh Street. (That is: On a 5,000-squarefoot lot, barring a specific variance, only a 2,000-square-foot home could be built.) The proposal formally originated with the

Organization of Central East Austin Neighborhoods, with the argument that the 2,300-square-foot home size is simply "out of proportion" for the historically smaller neighborhood lots and that the 40% limit is more realistic. But Henderson, who lives in and owns several lots in East Austin, describes the proposal in his letter to residents as an attempt by OCEAN and the city to "take away property rights" and is asking his neighbors to join him "in the fight for our current property rights."

Henderson's typo-spattered letter denounces "gentrification" and concedes the usefulness of the existing McMansion ordinance in limiting oversized houses and simultaneously advocates

"more density" while describing historical East Austin as "a community of small lots and modest homes." Presumably, the proposed limitations would reinforce the latter characteristic but Henderson reiterates at length that the proposal is nothing more than an unnecessary attack on property rights, "Big government trying to control our Historically Black Community," an attempt to "run us all off." He closes by asking residents to join him at City Hall on Jan. 17. (See Henderson's letter linked to this story at austinchronicle.com.)

Asked via e-mail for his response to Henderson's letter, OCEAN President Rudy Williams noted a related letter Henderson wrote to Mayor Will Wynn, adding curtly, "Please note there are more than 20 'I's and 'me's' in his email. I believe this indicates his real concern about the neighborhood." In a subsequent e-mail to Williams, Henderson says he is considering a class-action lawsuit against the neighborhood group.

In an e-mail thread involving other residents, several acknowledged Henderson's history of philanthropic projects in East Austin. But Harold McMillan noted, "I think the issues at hand have little to do with Mr. Henderson's good deeds of the past. The issues he raises are about his want to engage in commercial real estate development in the neighborhood. It seems to me, his issues are the same ones that would be raised by a developer (of any stripe) whose intent was to maximize personal profit for their development activities, regardless of and perhaps to the detriment of broader neighborhood preservation concerns.

"The real issue is not about profit, but about - Michael King the level of profit."

The Salvation Army is thankful for a \$730,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, but that money won't go toward the gap in funding created by the Capital Area United Way's new community investment strategy. Maj. Stephen Ellis said the grant, announced this week by Rep. Lloyd Doggett, is restricted to the stand-alone Passages program, a six-agency collaborative intended to get families in shelters back on their feet. The \$270,000 lost in United Way funding, on the other hand, was unrestricted funding the organization used to provide counseling and job-search services to those who use the Salvation Army's Downtown shelter. Ellis said his agency's staff and board will begin meeting this week to talk about how to address the anticipated cuts in funding.

lic Texas High School Project, funded by the state, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, the Michael & Susan Dell Foundation, and the Communities Foundation of Texas. The project funds new models of high schools in order to increase graduation rates and promote a college-going culture. The new high schools will be in the Cedar Hill, Edgewood, Frenship, Houston, and Mercedes school districts, and the math and science academies will be in the Fruitvale, Galveston, and Houston school districts. The project has funded a total of 91 high schools.

The state's electricity grid operator, the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, reported recently that supplies of reserve power, which ward off blackouts during extreme weather or major outages, will be sufficient until 2011 - adding two years to a May 2007 estimate. ERCOT credits a 255megawatt natural-gas power plant and two large coal plants being built by Energy Future Holdings (formerly TXU), set to come online in 2009 and 2010. adding 2.291 megawatts of power, ERCOT's previous estimate, that power reserves would fall short by 2009, was used as a major justification for the controversial ${\rm CO}_2$ -belching coal plants. Modest state energy-conservation

mandates were implemented in 2007, but energy experts say much more energy savings are possible statewide. Texas has been the top wind-energy producer in the nation for two years and in 2007 became the first state to add 1,000 megawatts of wind power in a single year. Newly approved power lines could deliver up to 25,000 megawatts of new electricity by 2012. ERCOT says power reserve estimates could become increasingly tight after 2011 but that it is tracking projects capable of adding tens of thousands of megawatts to the grid by 2013.

Of his new hometown, Portland Trail Blazers rookie superstar Greg Oden complained to The Indianapolis Star: "The only thing is, they don't have any Wal-Marts near my house. I go to Best Buy or Target, but those places are pretty expensive.' - Lee Nichols

Newspapers continue to retrench as they attempt to adjust to the Digital Age. The latest move comes from the San Antonio Express-News, which at the end of the year stopped home delivery and single-copy sales to Austin, as well as to several parts of South Texas, including McAllen, Brownsville, and Corpus Christi. "It's purely and simply a cost-cutting move," Publisher Tom Stephenson told the Associated Press. "In some parts of the state, we were operating at a very significant loss." In October, the Hearst-owned paper announced plans to cut 40 to 50 jobs through buybacks and attrition. The Dallas Morning News and Houston Chronicle have also cut staff in the last year. At one point, expanding distribution and coverage beyond core areas was seen as the key growth industry for newspapers, as they cast a wider net for readers. But papers around the country, unable to gain traction in outlying communities, have been cutting back on zoned editions and broad distribution, "The State Desk mission remains the same because we cover South Texas primarily for the benefit of our readers in San Antonio and the surrounding counties," Express-News Editor Robert Rivard told the AP.

- Former White House Deputy Chief of Staff Karl Rove will receive a reported \$1.5 million for his autobiography from Threshold Editions, a right-wing imprint at Simon & Schuster. Run by Mary Matalin, a former assistant to President George W. Bush and counselor to Vice President Dick Cheney it has become the memoir outlet of choice for a series of Bushies, including Mary and Lynne Cheney, former U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. John Bolton, former Governor of Iraq L. Paul Bremer III, White House counselor Ed Gillespie, and Alfred S. Regnery of arch-conservative press Regnery Publishing, the company responsible for the John Kerry-bashing *Unfit for Command*.
- The old winning combo of an oral citizenship declaration and not looking like a menace to the nation will no longer cut it for United States, Canadian, and Bermudian citizens coming into the U.S. via official land and sea entry points. According to a U.S. Customs and Border Protection press release, "effective January 31, 2008, all travelers will be expected to present documents proving citizenship, such as a birth certificate, and government-issued documents proving identity, such as a driver's license, when entering the United States." The new rule is a product of the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004's Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative, one of the federal government's many post-9/11 attempts to strengthen border security. - A recently released letter revealed the UT System won't be divesting from Sudan anytime soon, despite calls from students and politicians for UT to cut ties with the nation for its human-rights record. The system's investment company, known as UTIMCO, is prevented by its own investment policies from "social investment," according to the letter from UTIMCO CEO Bruce Zimmerman to UT System Board of Regents Chairman H. Scott Caven. Furthermore, the letter said, even if UTIMCO wanted to divest, it would be difficult to achieve, since the company farms out much of the portfolio management to other firms. UTIMCO estimates \$27.6 million - one-tenth of 1% of the total portfolio - is invested directly or indirectly in companies identified by the state divestment task force. Almost 80% of that money is invested in China Petroleum & Chemical Corp. and PetroChina, two of the Sudanese government's biggest partners. Although other state-managed funds, such as public employee pension funds, are required by a state law to divest, UTIMCO is exempt.
- Citizens annoyed about cars illegally parked in **spaces reserved for drivers** with disabilities can do something polite about it. The Governor's Committee on People With Disabilities is issuing courtesy reminders to be placed on windshields of cars blocking access. The nonbinding notices are intended to educate drivers parked in a reserved space, on an access aisle, or across a ramp. Any citizen can request one from the state and place them on windshields of offending vehicles. No formal training is necessary; however, "to protect the safety of all concerned," the committee wisely notes, "use of the reminders is recommended only when a vehicle is not occupied."
- The U.S. Senate recently confirmed demographics professor Steve Murdock as the next director of the U.S. Census Bureau. A Texas native, Murdock is a professor of sociology at Rice University and director of the Texas State Data Center, Murdock was the first official state demographer of Texas, and Texas Monthly named him among "The 25 Most Powerful Texans" in 2005. "Demography is a divine calling," said Murdock in an online article. "We know it is because there is a book of Numbers in the Bible, and it's all about the census."
- The Texas Education Agency is opening seven new high schools that will specifically recruit low-income, minority students and prepare them for college, as well as three new Texas Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math academies. The new schools are part of the \$261 million private-pub-

TOP 10 LOCAL STORIES TOBY TO SOS

- 1) Farewell Futrell By her own measure, city managers have an official life expectancy of five to seven years, so Toby's departure is pretty much right on schedule. Despite much recent melodrama and gratuitous public vitriol, Futrell dedicated her public (and much of her private) life to Austin and fully deserves a graduating
- 2) Acquiring Acevedo The model for the Futrell successor search was supposed to be the acquisition of new Austin Police Department Chief Art Acevedo, but right now the council seems determined to turn it into a quick round of spin the bottle. The city surprised suspicious onlookers by picking the Acevedo plum - we can't expect that kind of luck twice in a row, can we?
- 3) Cooling the City (and Planet) Austin emerged as a national leader against global warming, thanks to public activism and leadership from Mayor Will Wynn and Roger Duncan, Austin Energy's deputy general manager. We can't be certain that what we do here will reverberate nationally - but there will be no redirecting the global climate ship without everybody lifting an oar.



4) The Shooting of Kevin Brown Another police shooting of a young black man rocked the city in June, and although the circumstances were muddled as always, new Chief Acevedo passed the public test by terminating

- Sgt. Michael Olsen in November. The story isn't concluded: Olsen is appealing, and the city's review process is itself being reviewed, but it feels like the tide is shifting against summary police injustice.
- 5) Smile, You've Been Wal-Marted! A bitter dispute between near-north neighborhoods and the city ended in court, as Responsible Growth for Northcross (and the Allandale Neighborhood Association) sued over the approval of a Wal-Mart Supercenter on the site of the former Northcross Mall. Last week the judge ruled for the city, but RG4N vowed to fight on, and the dispute promises to shadow this spring's council elections.
- 6) It's Unconventional A very strange miniscandal paused this month, as former Convention Center Director Robert Hodge was indicted for record-tampering by a grand jury but avoided indictment on much more serious charges of financial improprieties. The city vows tighter controls, the record-tampering was apparently pointless, and Hodge may prove to have been a casualty of a change in the City Hall weather - from small-town arbitrariness to big-city officiousness.
- 7) It's Our Lakeside! Lady Bird Lake was at the center of several hot stories: the unveiling of an innovative city park (conceived in the surrounding neighborhoods), a battle to protect the waterfront against encroachment, and

the renaming of the unpretentious Town Lake itself in honor of the first lady who made it so central to her Austin. It's yours, if you can keep it.

- 8) The Full Treatment After more than 20 years of pure-dee Austin dithering, the city has apparently found a site for Water Treatment Plant No. 4, expected to treat all that water we're anticipating to buy for the next 50 years from the Lower Colorado River Authority. There will be plenty more arguments – like where to find the money to close the deal - and with any luck, in 20 years we'll actually build the thing.
- 9) Leaving Children Behind As merciless federal and state education policies steadily filter downward, the kids in the neighborhoods are becoming the inevitable pawns. Johnston High School is on the Texas Education Agency bubble, with the new year to determine whether it - and Reagan and Travis and ... - will be sacrificed to political notions of what constitutes "accountability."
- 10) SOS for SOS After years of environmental derring-do (and legal brinkmanship), Save Our Springs Alliance was forced into bankruptcy by one more lawsuit and a sprawl developer who thus far refuses to settle for less than SOS extinction. If the court can't find a middle ground, Austin's cutting edge of environmental activism may be dispersed to the next-generational eco-winds.

TOP 10 TOBY MOMENTS WHERE HAVE ALL THE FLOWERS GONE?

Is her journey ours? The evolution of Toby Futrell mirrors and personalizes Austin's transformation from stoned, sleepy slack-town to condo-shocked L.A. on training wheels. On the eve of her successor's selection, we present our "Top 10 Toby Moments" - from the barefoot, Hippie-hallowed child of lost Austin to today's corporatist city micromanager of Manhattan on the Colorado.

- 1) You're Right, That Does Hurt Love her or loathe her, all observers acknowledge Futrell's undeniably hands-on approach. One dramatic example of many over the years: In the early 1990s, investigating complaints about EMS transport, Futrell field-researched the problem by hurtling over speed bumps while strapped down to an ambulance gurney.
- 2) Toby Futrell, Pet Detective A hagiographic Statesman profile on the ascendent city manager noted that in 1992, Futrell personally and furtively surveilled the troubled animal shelter, "watching animals get gassed in large groups, climbing on the roof at night to photograph rats stealing food from the cages." If that Ace Ventura impersonation wasn't enough, "she spent Saturdays patrolling around Town Lake on a golf cart with a Parks employee, searching for a predator that was leaving swans dead on the shore."
- 3) Anybody Find Those Hippie Hollow Pics? If the early press on Toby sought to impart anything, it's that she was "Austin" through and through. In his Chronicle profile ("She's One of Us," June 7, 2002), Mike Clark-Madison recounted that when voters approved 1998 open-space bonds, "Futrell danced barefoot within the drum circle, under the stars, at the victory party thrown by [the Save Our Springs Alliance]."
- 4) Dyslexia in Plain English This year's SaveTownLake.org lawsuit, looking to stop waterfront condo encroachment, is based on explicit height limits laid out in the city's 1986 Land Development Code - limits that mysteriously vanished following a supposedly nonsubstantive 1999 "plain English" rewrite - an effort overseen by then Assistant City Manager Toby Futrell.

5) Building Point Austin Although there is credit to spread over many hands and many years - architects Antoine Predock, Juan Cotera, and Phil Reed; Mayors Watson and Wynn; her mentor/predecessor, Juan Garza - the city's distinguished and distinguishing City Hall was completed on Futrell's watch, in a swirl of post-9/11 financial headaches and determination to make the building reflect the spirit of the city. It does so, from

its music-and-politics plaza to its armadillo-"stinger" tail, and when Futrell moves on, she can look back on this landmark building as one of her proudest accomplishments.

6) Who's Fouling the Springs? When the Statesman claimed in 2003 that Barton Springs was awash in toxic hydrocarbons seeping in from ancient, mysterious "coalgas" sources, Futrell spearheaded debunking efforts, tracing the chemicals eventually to oil-based sealants on nearby parking lots - most prominently, testing the Statesman's own lot along Town Lake for the culprit chems. The council eventually passed a groundbreaking ordinance banning the sealants, which seemed to mark a turning point in the city manager's heretofore cozy relationship with the denizens of the Batcave on Town Lake.

7) Unforgivable Loan On a prime political test, the city manager turned in an embarrassing low score: unprepared. When landmark African-American nightclub Midtown Live burned down in 2005, partly as penance for police responders' boorish reaction ("Burn baby, burn"), Futrell precipitously proposed a forgivable \$750,000 rebuilding loan. Following talk-radio uproar and City Council backlash (most notably from the since deferential Brewster McCracken), the offer was withdrawn. In the years since, it has reverberated into realms as disparate as the African American Quality of Life Initiative and the Las Manitas Ioan fracas. Final grade: incomplete.

8) Here Comes the Story of the Hurricane When Hurricane Katrina sent thousands packing to Austin, Will Wynn was the smiling public face of Austin's response, and Rudy Garza was its in-house manager - and both presented a stark contrast to the Bush administration's smirking indifference. When disaster struck, Katrina's evacuees were fortunate to have as indefatigable a planner and executor as Futrell in charge of opera-

> tions, and like Calamity Jane, said to be her very best in a crisis. Now about those ordinary times ...

9) The "But Money Magazine Loves Us" Defense Toby's late-period "queen of all she surveys" imperiousness was epitomized by her response to a key May 2006 report from the city auditor. After detailed review of peer city practices, the auditor strongly recommended to City Council an update to the city's adopted vision and comprehensive plan for future growth. Futrell instantaneously killed it (citing national media accolades); the mayor and council meekly submitted to her political will. Comprehensive planning does so crimp one's wielding of personal power!

10) It's All Relative A year ago, her hidden-in-plain-sight conflict of interest with Wal-Mart (her husband does contract HVAC work for the company)

cast further shadows over the already contentious Northcross controversy. In 2007, a welter of miniscandals unfolded (the Convention Center, the Austin City Store, and her "executive expenditures" stocking it, etc.). In spring, City Council gave her a break - along with raises and accolades - with the expectation she'd soon announce her retirement. She didn't until late summer - and when she did, it was partially to bump a story about the nepotistic placement of a relative at Austin Energy. As Futrell told the Austin Business Journal in 2006, "The moment I become political, get rid of me." While council was too cowed to do so, ultimately Futrell took her own advice.

1) Tell 'Em How Much Fun It Was! No sooner had 2007 arrived than Molly Ivins left us, after a long, plucky fight with breast cancer. Her passing created a gaping news hole in hundreds of newspapers and periodicals that carried her witty, populist-driven commentaries. Few scribes can nail Texas politics the way Molly did, but we take to heart one of her most valuable lessons: "And when you get through kickin' ass and celebratin' the sheer joy of a good fight, be sure to tell those who come after how much fun it was!" For present example, look how much fun 2007 was ...

- 2) Craddick vs. the House No one rocks the House like Speaker Tom Craddick, who managed to fend off, by hook and crook, two attempted coups at the dramatic beginning and chaotic end of the 2007 legislative session. With all but a few of his lieutenants having bailed or been kicked out of his shrinking inner circle, Craddick not only faces a slew of challengers in 2009, but the Midland lifer has even drawn - oh insult too cruel! - a Democratic 2008 opponent.
- 3) Kids Behind Bars In the national embarrassment department, Texas had a stellar year. Along with a still-booming execution conveyor line, the Texas Youth Commission scandal brilliantly served to strengthen the Lone

Star State's laughing-stock image. (There's also that little matter of the governor we cheerfully exported to D.C., but we're trying not to think about that.) After all the sordid horror stories coming out of the juvenile prisons, the Lege finally stepped in with headlinegrabbing quotes but few resources, and judging from continuing reports, not much has changed - meaning "Kids Behind Bars" will likely serve as a headline for next year, too.

- 4) Don't Ask, Don't Vaccinate Politicians and pharmaceutical companies go together like ... drugs and money. Take Gov. Rick Perry. His surprise mandate requiring girls to be vaccinated against a sexually transmitted virus that can cause cervical cancer generated a passionate national debate - about sex. Moral conservatives yelped that Perry's executive order would promote prepubescent promiscuity. Democrats publicly hailed the order but privately questioned whether Perry was merely helping out his old pal Mike Toomey, the lobbyist for the vaccine's manufacturer, Merck. In the end, legislators overturned Perry's edict, and that was that.
- 5) Highway to Nowhere Perry's imperially ambitious but publicly reviled Trans-Texas Corridor project got its chain vanked, as lawmakers responded to citizen protests over the Texas Department of Transportation's brazen toll-roadbuilding blitz (while still protecting toll projects in their hometowns). Now, it's hard to tell who's pulling whose drive chain, but TxDOT looks to be settling scores by messing with certain local road projects previously deemed safe. Local case in point, state Sen, Kirk Watson is blaring his horn over TxDOT's claim that it's short some \$500 million needed to complete a longplanned CenTex road package, recalling the old Texas adage: All's fair in highways and politics.
- 6) TXU Sells Out After beginning the year with 11 dirty coal plants in the queue, the wholly unpopular TXU Corp. sold itself, took on a new name (Energy Future Holdings/Luminant), and green-washed its image with a slick ad campaign and a promise to slim down its proposed pollution portfolio from 11 plants to three (including, alas, the worst). Now Luminant is on deck to retrofit existing plants as part of its pledge to cut pollution 20%. How can the company possibly clean up its coal-fired act without leaving Texas in the dark? Read our 2008 lips: "Nuke-ular."
- 7) Let 'Em Study Cake Among Rick Perry's many ham-handed vetoes this summer was one that axed \$154 million in health-care funding for Texas community-college employ-

ees, on inexplicable grounds concerning the way some of the funds were being paid. The veto touched off college budget crises all over the state and a wave of outrage among legislators and administrators who said Perry failed to raise his concerns during the session. The funding was eventually restored when Perry, Dewhurst, and Craddick (the Legislative Budget Board, aka the Oops! Brigade) agreed to make good. The political consensus was that Gov. Goodhair had unnecessarily plunged higher education into temporary financial chaos - but hey, 39% of voting Texans think he's doing just fine.

- 8) Anybody Know How to Work This Thing? The state's Children's Health Insurance Program was damn near nonfunctional by the time state officials finally owned up to their 2005 mistake and pulled the plug on a disastrous \$899 million contract with the private outsourcing firm Accenture. The company had been hired to streamline and "improve" the administration of CHIP, but the bumbling experiment was cursed by a whole series of failures, from computer snafus to poor training of workers (replacing the more experienced pink-slipped employees) to lost paperwork to – worst of all and inevitably – a dramatic drop in the number of children receiving health benefits.
- 9) Drop Dead We Close at 5 That Sharon Keller – what a charmer. The clock-watching chief justice of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals barred the courthouse door to defense attorneys trying to file a last-minute appeal that would have spared the life of convicted killer and death row inmate Michael Richard, "We close at 5," was Keller's ho-hum explanation - four words that guaranteed Richard's pending execution. Never mind that the Supreme Court had just opened doors for similar appeals across the country over the constitutionality of lethal injections - that's why it's called a deadline.
- 10) You Celebrate Xmas Your Way, and I'll Celebrate Xmas My Way Granny, get your gun! Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson just can't fathom the idea that any red-blooded Texan might visit a park without packing a firearm. So he's defying the original land donor's wishes in a rush to market the state-owned Christmas Mountains to private (i.e., pro-gun) interests, while digging in his heels against any sale to the National Park Service, which would ban firearms and hunting. "Public" is the operative word here, but Patterson insists the gun factor is a deal breaker. No guns, no hunting, no sale – or, reach for the sky, tree-hugger.

COUNSELING PROGRAM FOR DRUG ABUSE IN LIMBO

Travis County officials are scrambling to find an alternate site for a grant-based drug and substance-abuse counseling program after neighbors protested a possible lease in an East 11th Street building owned by Ebenezer Baptist Church.

Commissioners have heard plenty of objections from the **Guadalupe Association for an Improved Neighborhood** over the county's proposed lease. Neighborhood leaders say the area is already overburdened with problem neighbors, including nearby homeless shelters.

The center in the church's Marvin Griffin Building would have been staffed with seven counselors for day and evening counseling sessions, Community Supervision and Corrections Department Director Geraldine Nagy told the Commissioners Court. The location would be used for individual and group therapy sessions for low-risk offenders. "The

offenses will be felonies or misdemeanors. Anyone with a history of a sexual offense will never go there, nor will individuals who are supervised in the mental-health unit," Nagy said. "That priority population will not be served there, nor will the people who face offenses against persons."

That did not satisfy neighbors, which frustrated those with the East Austin Economic Development Corp., which serves as Ebenezer's nonprofit development arm in the community. Local longtime activist General Marshall, who sits on the EAEDC board, said it's ironic Ebenezer's own projects were being used against the church. "[EAEDC Executive Director] Van Johnson informed you two weeks ago that the Guadalupe neighborhood association did not support Ebenezer Child Development Center nor the Ebenezer Senior Village ... nor the Robertson Hill Apartments and condos that were mentioned a few minutes ago," Marshall said. "So we were surprised and found it a little odd that our own programs were now being used against us in leasing the Griffin office building."

Neighborhood representatives argued the program might be new to Travis County but cited national studies showing substance-abuse offenders often are rearrested. Resident Buck McKinney claimed that if those statistics held true, Travis County's proposal to treat 1,500 people at the counseling center would mean 375 of those participants would eventually be rearrested for committing a violent crime.

The counseling services would be funded from a \$650,000 state grant, which would provide a permanent centralized location for counseling sessions for the county's probationers. But each week the county fails to find a location, it loses \$11,000

When commissioners returned from an executive session on the lease, among other items, County Judge Sam Biscoe said Nagy had withdrawn her proposal to lease the space. In making the announcement, Biscoe noted the lease was a thorny issue for the county, a program that would incur opposition in almost any neighborhood.

TOP 10 CITY COUNCIL MOMENTS

- 1) Send in the Clowns All year long, the pending retirement of incumbent City Manager Toby Futrell was the City Hall soap opera, complete with an ever-retreating exit date and backstage tears over council's determination to just get on with it. As the new year dawns, they're still looking, but we gave them the three-ring formula back in August: "Betty Dunkerley told the Statesman Austin needs a 'magician,' while some lobbyist or another said they'd have big shoes to fill. Put those two together, and you've got ... Bozo the City Manager? Great for kids' parties and council meetings - to the extent they're distinguishable." Or as the song goes: "They're already here ..."
- 2) Unboxing Day In February, after the Northcross Wal-Mart Supercenter got in under the wire, City Council passed the long-delayed Big Box Ordinance - intended to subject such enormo-projects to stricter public scrutiny. The conspiratorial question on everyone's mind was: What took so long? Futrell insisted the SuperWalton would have been grandfathered anyway - leaving the neighborhoods, as usual, fighting the last war. Oh, and a little thing called the Congress Avenue Retail Retention and Enhancement Fund passed on the same day.
- 3) Budget Trek: The Wrath of Toby A \$27.5 million "forecast gap" from city staff rattles the Austin Enterprise, then mysteriously teleports away, while council ducks for PR cover and the citizens wonder whatever happened to boom-for-everybody warp speed. Futrell and Mike Martinez set phasers to flame-war. (Martinez: "Please stop with the rhetoric, Toby. It really is not necessary. And it's painfully and embarrassingly transparent.") Martinez tells BTP he didn't meet with Futrell and staff on last-minute budget numbers due to previous sessions being "unproductive" and "full of rhetoric." Despite Tribble-like multiplications of "cost-drivers," Futrell's presented budget miraculously balances.
- 4) Unparticipatory Democracy If the Charter Revision Committee meets and nobody shows up, do single-member districts falling in the forest make a noise? A Martinez-driven push for a newly districted council receives resounding citizen silence, until it's finally put online; the committee gets enough

December Web response to cancel its remaining meetings and to recommend a charter vote this spring. Will the council accept the hot potato, and if it does, will voters notice?

- 5) Rock & Roll All Night Marathon Thursday council sessions routinely last into the wee hours, often with crucial votes after midnight, and staff is asked to offer a plan for more efficiency, less endlessness. Staff brilliantly concludes citizen comments could be cut from three to two minutes and the resulting public backlash jettisons the whole effort. We've tried nothing, they say - and we're all outta ideas. Are these guys getting time-and-a-half? Cuz we're not.
- 6) No More Breakfast Tacos for You In the middle of the Las Manitas donnybrook, Brewster McCracken spills the refried beans on the Salsa Sisters, telling a radio audience the city was strong-armed into its forgivable-loan offer by the eatery's control over its alley right-of-way - allegedly holding it hostage against a deal with new Marriott developer. Shortly thereafter, the deal blows up, City Council still has migas on its face, and ... what about that triple-decker convention hotel? Anybody smell a campaign issue ... or is that just a whole lotta mole?
- 7) Panhandling Smackdown When a couple of neighborhood associations complain about street-corner panhandlers, McCracken and Jennifer Kim look for a policy (or campaign) handle. The resulting civil liberties backlash - and resistance from other council members - creates a yearlong push-mepull-you over social services, public safety, firefighters' boot collections, and ... oh, yeah: "Isn't anybody going to think about the children?!" Most of the fuss died down in November - but like cedar fever, it's always in the wind.
- 8) It's a Doggie Dog World The bond project to build a new animal shelter runs smack into an animal-advocate war over where to put it - on the Eastside Levander Loop, as planned, or right where it already sits, on floodable Downtown parkland suddenly declared sacred ground by animalists who had been the dogs that did not bark during months of bond hearings. After a vitriolic Oct. 11 public hearing, council splits the puppy by voting shelter for Eastside (despite howls from yet another set of affordable-housing absolutists, abhorring a "dog hotel") and adoption center for Lady Bird Lake. It ain't wagging away:



FixAustin sued the city anyway, and the whole deal will come back to council via zoning issues. Bring your dog whistles.

- 9) The Angry Young Mayor Heretofore a mayor of sweetness and light, the 2007 Will Wynn developed a rep for going ballistic at inopportune public moments. First there was the South by Southwest party crasher at his Downtown condo complex, who accused His Surliness of attempting to throttle him just for being a garden-variety idiot (we've been there), then the 311 call from a rattled construction foreman roundly cursed by Hizzoner for blocking morning rush-hour traffic. With a year and a half to go, should we hope for a Fiorello or for a Giuliani? Peace for the citizens – or better copy for BTP? (We know how we're voting.)
- 10) Kim's Airport Insecurity With a mysterious assist from City Hall, the Statesman acquires documentation of an apparent Jennifer Kim demand for security-free access to Austin-Bergstrom International Airport's restricted gates, resulting in much public hilarity, followed by public remorse from the council member. Unfortunately, KVUE discovers Kim also attempted to pull rank on a ticketing cop - "Do you know who I am?" and before the dust settles, a Kim staffer takes the blame and the exit. We wouldn't bring it up, of course - except that you will soon hear it in chorus from the herd hoping to retire Kim come the May election.

TOP 10 DEVELOPING STORIES LESSONS LEARNED

- 1) Developers Pay Up 2007 will be remembered as the year Austin raised its standards for the public benefits we expect from the private interests that shape our city. What's new: No developer dared ask for a major height/ density variance from council in 2007 without first offering up "voluntary" contributions for the public good. A series of City Councilbacked initiatives this year signals a real if nascent culture shift: the density-bonus initiative, affordable-housing fees-in-lieu, expanded park-dedication fees, stronger urban design standards, etc. Lesson learned: Economic development alone no longer punches a developer's ticket.
- 2) Densifying Downtown The urban fabric became more tightly woven this year: highrising towers, livelier streetscapes and nightlife, scarcer parking, some 2,600 new condos under construction (median asking price \$800,000) and another 2,300 planned. Most City Hall newsy: The spat over Capitol View Corridors, \$124 million in new flood controls for Waller Creek, the Second Street retail district, density as climate protection, and a 2008 referendum for Downtown rail transit. Most crucial: completing Phase I of the Downtown Austin Plan, as a comprehensive road map. Lesson learned: Growth is a given; the question now is quality.

- 3) Climate Protection With the watershed 2007 passage of the Austin Climate Protection Plan, the city moved to require green building and energy efficiency, with more stringent new construction standards each year. Buyers of some older houses will need to make energyefficiency improvements. Smart developers are embracing higher standards, because in Austin, green sells. Lesson learned: Austinites will pay for buildings that work for climate protection.
- 4) Las Manitas Saga This twisting tale epitomized the struggle to preserve Austin's unique character - and the community's angst over change. When City Council rose to defend the iconic Downtown Tex-Mex eatery against the Marriott hotel chain, our elected officials appeared noble champions of keeping Austin weird, but when they offered up a \$750,000 forgivable loan, public opinion turned ugly. Las Manitas' owners reclaimed folk-hero status by finally rejecting the city's loan - then struck their own deal with the landowner/developer. Still uncertain: the fates of both the planned trihotel complex and the taco joint. Lesson learned: We're weird all right.
- 5) Northcross Mall, RG4N, and Big Box The (continuing) fight over Northcross Mall's redevelopment – as New Urbanist town center or a dumb mall with gargantuan Wal-Mart? has been a painful lesson in how much civic grief one bad developer can inflict. Also exposed: lack of council consensus, staff's power to subvert council policy, and city weaknesses in urban planning. Silver lining: In the uproar, the Big Box Ordinance passed (to pre-

vent future such debacles). Lesson learned: Council has shown notably more fortitude and leadership in championing good development.

- 6) Rally Around the River Lady Bird Lake (née Town Lake) saw a 2007 outpouring of citizen love. Everyone from Jimmie Dale Gilmore to the mayor sang out for protection, plus trail improvements and completion (with a boardwalk?). New nonprofit SaveTownLake.org led a populist rally against developers seeking variances for tall towers on the shoreline. Council (led by Mike Martinez) listened, got out in front, and vocally opposed on principle one-off variances to Waterfront Overlav District protections - then reinstated a WO task force. Still pending: the lightning-rod CWS project that kicked it all off. Lesson learned: Austinites love their river, and council can do the righteous thing.
- 7) Concordia Concord The frustrating discord over redevelopment of Concordia University's 22-acre central campus exhausted all parties involved. An intelligent, detailed ROMA Design Group site plan finally achieved consensus among neighborhood associations, city officials and staff, and developer East End IG where adversarial lawyers and positions had failed. Citizens beseeched council to create a better process. Lesson learned: Council moved to draft new, higher standards (now largely completed) for planned unit developments.
- 8) New Transit Town Two major new public planning processes began in 2007 to better align development patterns with transit corridors and rail. For the new vertical mixed-use zoning:

Neighborhoods across Austin reviewed and recommended how (and where) the city should promote desired density. For transit-oriented development: Station Area Planning was largely completed along Capital Metro's new commuter-rail line. In November, Mayor Wynn called for a 2008 voter referendum for a modern central-city streetcar. Lesson learned: Austin is finally getting on board with pro-transit cities like Portland, Ore.; San Francisco; and even Dallas.

- 9) UT's Brackenridge Tract Another hefty chunk of old Central Austin was put on the block, eliciting more neighborhood and city pleas for enlightened urban planning. This time, the self-interested "greedy developer" is UT-Austin. The tract's 345 acres include Lions Municipal Golf Course, which the city dearly wants to keep - but UT has barely given the city's planning wishes a polite nod. The townand-gown power wrangle is sure to be fascinating; the city may discover what it feels like to be a placated-yet-powerless neighborhood association. Lesson learned: Beware of the Big Gorilla.
- 10) Downtown North The upscale Domain retail/restaurant/residential site is the first phase of a 10-year plan to transform the old IBM campus at MoPac and 183 into a walkable, New Urbanist "second downtown." Upon adoption of the North Burnet/Gateway Area Master Plan, the area should become our eighth official transit-oriented development district to follow the quality-critical three Ds: density, diversity, and design. Lesson learned: Growing Austin well requires high-quality planning and urban design - in the burbs, too.

TOP 10 MEDIA STORIES MORE IS LESS

In a year that saw Austin legend Molly Ivins pass away (see "Top 10 State Stories"), there was little cause for celebration in media circles.

With Ivins' death, wit and style moved a little farther to the back of the bus, driven by in-depth reports on Anna Nicole Smith's baby and sightings of Bigfoot. Real journalists were mocked, scorned, and fired in 2007. Revelations about nefarious government activities and environmental crises were ignored in favor of live coverage of Paris Hilton going to jail.

All in all, it was a dreary year for the Fourth Estate.

- 1) Riots in the Streets Media outlets around the country gobbled up the tale of a Mexican-American man torn limb from limb by a liquored-up mob of Juneteenth revelers in East Austin. The story was just too good to be true. And it turns out it wasn't. In the process, the stories ended up revealing far less about race relations and far more about the media's pack mentality and salivating desire for blood.
- 2) Damn That Media It turns out all the world's ills, from the inability to capture Osama bin Laden to genital herpes, can be blamed on the media. Who knew? Media-hating is the great uniter. The right wing smirks at every new revelation revealed by the liberal America-haters. The left wing mocks the Britney-fixated cowards. Meanwhile, the public yawned at attempts to develop a shield law to protect journalists' freedom.
- 3) Musical chairs As they say in the finance game, media properties were in play: KEYE was sold to the same private equity firm that gobbled up Chrysler. KXAN was for sale, and then it wasn't. Border Media sold off a bunch of radio stations. The list goes on and on. The one consistent factor: Not one transaction resulted in a better media outlet.

4) Air America

Crashes The Great Radio Hope for progressives continued to spiral into oblivion. Management filed for bankruptcy. Al Franken left to run



for Senate. Ratings plummeted. In Austin, KOKE dropped the network when it was sold to a chain specializing in Spanish-language formats. Few wept.

- 5) KXAN Reborn After a meltdown in '06, KXAN bounced back into the TV news competition with a new set, new graphics, and a new commitment to "Austin News." First sign of the new commitment to "Austin News" was a trip to Afghanistan. Otherwise, the station stuck to the rigid TV news format, except now the anchors stand and talk a lot, instead of sitting and talking. Radical!
- 6) The Statesman Lives! The Austin American-Statesman emerged from its Eisenhower-era schnooze with a snappy new look. Now the paper uses colorful graphics on Page 1 to tease high school football coverage and that swell fitness column. Editorial occasionally showed signs of a pulse, including the once-a-decade look at the University of Texas football program's extravagant budget. And yet - cruel irony - circulation and reader interest continued to slide.

- 7) The Incredible Shrinking Media Job security became a running joke in the industry. The Dallas Morning News, Houston Chronicle, and San Antonio Express-News all slashed staff. Radio stations like rocker KLBJ-FM continued to jettison old-timers. TV newsrooms look like junior-college journalism workshops. And local advertising agency icon GSD&M, once a bastion of creativity and energy, cut staff and switched management after losing a string of big accounts.
- 8) Diversity Reigns No, not in terms of race. Most media outlets remain lily white. But the selection and variety of ways for the public to gather information continued to explode. The New York Times ditched its pay service, opening its doors to the great unwashed; The Wall Street Journal is sure to follow. Blogs, podcasts, and social network sites like Facebook created new ways to flood data to anyone interested in finding it.
- 9) FCC Slapdown The Federal Communications Commission relaxed rules prohibiting conglomerates from buying multiple properties, while ignoring the plight of smaller players. Government regulators were far more concerned about the utterance of even a single nasty word, which has left FCC-governed broadcasters shaking in their weenie boots. One casualty was KVET icon Sammy Allred, who was canned after muttering one too many bad words.
- 10) New Technology Flounders HD radio was a bomb. Only one TV station, KEYE, made the move into HD. Copyright fees threatened to gut Internet radio. And satellite-radio pioneers XM and Sirius, unable to make it on their own, tried to merge, reminding everyone that cool technology is no guarantee of success.



TOP 10 2007 JOINTS REEFER MADNESS

- 1) Down With Crack On Nov. 1, the first step toward eliminating the draconian 100-to-1 crack-to-powder-cocaine federal sentencing ratio took effect, cutting crack-related federal sentences by an average of 16 months for most defendants. On Dec. 11, officials made the downgraded sentences retroactive for all federal prisoners - nearly 20,000 inmates, almost 10% of the entire federal population. Beginning March 3, more than 2,500 will be eligible to apply for early release. If Congress would eliminate the same disparity from the mandatory-minimum sentencing scheme, there would really be something to celebrate.
- 2) Hold Those Handcuffs To ease county jail overcrowding, HB 2391 - authored by Rep. Jerry Madden, R-Richardson, and carried by Sen. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo - downgraded a host of minor crimes, including minor marijuana possession, to ticket-only offenses, offering police the option to write citations for possession of up to 4 ounces of pot. The Travis Co. Sheriff's Office is on board, estimating that last year some 7,000 people were booked for the offenses listed under the new law - along with pot possession, criminal mischief, graffiti, and misdemeanor theft. APD is officially still pending.
- 3) Ron "Hemp" Paul for President Surfside Republitarian Rep. Ron Paul is unique, and consistent - especially on most issues of personal liberty (excepting, alas, women's reproductive rights). He's the only member of Congress with the guts to call the drug war a failure, and to support industrial hemp farming. For the second time, he filed the Industrial Hemp Farming Act, which would return the environmentally friendly rotation crop to the nation's agricultural landscape. "This could be something to help the economy," he told us last spring. "Any kind of problem that we deal with, if there's no violence and no harm done, then it should be left to the people to

decide." Amen!

- The quest of North Dakota farmers to cultivate non-narcotic industrial cannabis on their family farms ramped up this year, with farmers Wavne Hauge and Dave Monson (a veteran Republican state lawmaker) filing a federal suit to get the DEA to butt out of their agriculture: NoDak has enacted strict hemp-farming regulations, and that should be enough. In November a federal district judge ruled that although he had little faith the DEA would really consider the farmers' bid to grow the crop, federal law does indeed give the agency oversight over hemp operations - it would be up to Congress, he ruled, to change that. Monson and Hauge appealed in December.
- 5) Drug War Censorship According to a 5-4 U.S. Supreme Court majority led by Chief Justice John Roberts, speech that invokes the bogeyman - drugs! - is not protected, at least at a "school-sanctioned" event. An Alaska teen. Joseph Frederick, was handed a 10-day suspension for unfurling a banner that read "Bong Hits 4 Jesus" during the 2002 Olympic torch relay. School officials claimed the right to censor any speech that "advocates" drug use - though

Frederick insisted his banner was simply a political message. The Supremes, like good vice principals everywhere, brought the hammer down.

- 6) Raich Fights On After five years of legal wrangling, famed California medi-pot patient/ advocate Angel Raich announced in May that she would drop her appeals. Raich, plagued by illnesses including an inoperable brain tumor and wasting disease, wanted only to secure her right to use medi-mari in compliance with state law. After a string of defeats affirmed the feds' right to prosecute her for toking up to alleviate her pain, Raich decided she'd had enough. She insists she will battle on elsewhere, lobbying Congress to extend compassion to millions of seriously ill patients.
- 7) Barr vs. Barr In March, the Marijuana Policy Project announced its newest Capitol Hill lobbying heavyweight: former Georgia GOP Rep. Bob Barr. Sweet smokin' Jesus! Barr. of the eponymous Barr Amendment, which threatened Washington, D.C., residents with losing all federal funding should they be so bold as to enable an approved citywide medi-pot law, suppressing the will of 70% of district voters. Last year Barr joined the Libertarians, and will now be lobbying to repeal his own amendment. Welcome to the bright side, Bob.
- 8) Judge Says Grow More Pot In an exhaustive February legal opinion, DEA Administrative Law Judge Mary Ellen Bittner agreed that University of Massachusetts professor Lyle Craker should be allowed to grow researchgrade pot inside his secured lab. Craker initially filed an application to

grow dope back in 2001, but his bid was stalled by DEA bureaucracy. Bittner ruled there's only a minimal risk that Craker's dope would move into the black market and that medical researchers need another source for consistent-quality weed. (The University of Mississippi currently

grows all fed-approved research pot.) But Bittner's ruling is nonbinding, and the DEA has made no move to approve Craker's application.

- 9) Needle Exchange Gets Stuck She's not a doctor - nor, thankfully, will she be a state rep much longer - but in May, Rep. Dianne Delisi's quackery derailed the Legislature's proposal to create an anonymous needle exchange program, supported by doctor and Sen. Robert Deuell, R-Greenville. San Antonio Rep. Ruth Jones McClendon revived a version that would create a pilot program, which has stalled thanks to Bexar District Attorney Susan Reed, who is also afraid of needles. Whether the program would violate state law regarding possession of drug paraphernalia is a question for Attorney General Greg Abbott, whose office is expected to release its opinion early this year.
- 10) NORML Goes Corporate Early last year the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws put on its blue suit and partnered with software designer Jian to offer a model corporate human-resources policy to cover off-the-clock marijuana use - aka an "enlightened" employee marijuana policy. In February, the granddaddy of pot policy organizations teamed up with former D.C. politico Webster Hubbell to get into the risk racket, writing life insurance policies for casual pot smokers. If they "make the market," says NORML Executive Director Allen St. Pierre, NORML may also forge onward into the health and disability insurance markets.

TOP 10 POLICE BEAT STORIES SHADES OF BLUE

- 1) New Top Cop The search to replace Stan Knee was a marathon - a reality star search featuring everything except a swimsuit competition. In the end, there was one outstanding candidate: Art Acevedo, a former chief with the California Highway Patrol. He had the necessary charisma and energy, impressing the Austin Police Association as well as dozens of community activists – groups that in recent years haven't been harmonizing "Kumbaya." Acevedo's quick wit and determination caught Austin's attention: we'll see if he can sustain the energy (and the honeymoon).
- 2) Brown Killed, Olsen Fired Even before Acevedo was sworn in, it was clear his first big test would be handling the June shooting death of Kevin Brown - shot twice in the back by Sgt. Michael Olsen after a late-night foot chase from the now-defunct Chester's Nightclub on East 12th Street. Olsen had been told the 25-year-old might be unlawfully carrying a firearm, but Brown was not packing when he was shot, and Olsen fired again when Brown was down and helpless. In November, Acevedo fired Olsen, ruling the officer had "abandoned" his good judgment, common sense, and police training, creating a deadly-force situation that should have been avoided.
- 3) DOJ Considers On June 1, city officials announced the U.S. Department of Justice would investigate the Austin Police Department to determine whether the department "is systematically violating constitutional rights, with a focus on the department's use of force," City Manager Toby Futrell wrote to council. It was welcome news for Nelson Linder of the Austin NAACP and Jim Harrington of the Texas Civil Rights Project, who'd requested an investigation in 2004 over concerns of excessive force against minority suspects including in the high-profile shootings of Sophia King, in 2002, and Jesse Lee Owens, in 2003. The other shoe is still suspended.
- 4) Drug War Hits Home In October, an earlymorning APD drug raid in Montopolis left a 72-year-old man in critical condition and an officer wounded. Police said neighbors complained that Felix Rosales was dealing crack: the raid came after minimal investigation, and discovered tiny amounts of marijuana and cocaine. Police say they clearly identified themselves and that Rosales knew who they were before he fired. Rosales was charged with attempted capital murder; he remains in critical condition. A grand jury declined to indict Detective Aaron Bishop for shooting Rosales; an internal investigation proceeds.
- 5) APD's Electric Pot Patrol Are you (or your house) an energy hog? You may well be on the APD's radar, pegged as a potential potgrower. At least one APD narco dick has made trolling through Austin Energy customer consumption records his personal pot-hunting beat, and the basis for a series of search warrants for properties owned by Austin resident Travis Colby. Although there's little real evidence linking Colby to any pot-growing, the

APD's data-mining operation has filed a federal case against the local real estate broker. Legal? Maybe, Ethical? When you're chasing the evil weed, who needs ethics?

- 6) Streamlining APD In August, the new chief unveiled a reorganization plan that, among other things, beefs up traffic enforcement and centralizes specialized units so they're available to respond to shifting crime trends. By vear end, the new executive team had already restyled the notorious No Information Office into an actual Public Information Office and was well on the way to implementing a new use-of-force policy and reporting system.
- 7) Birth of a Superhero Batman has his grappling hook; Wonder Woman has her Lasso of Truth: Spider-Man has his web. When the shi-zat really hits the fiz-an, wouldn't it be nice to have a superhero with the "unique ability" to function at "110%," as well as "enhanced speed, strength, agility, reflexes, hearing, and eyesight" - and, just in case things get really messy, an awesome mastery of nonlethal weapons? Meet the Defuser, aka APD Detective Jarrett Crippen, chosen by Marvel Comics legend Stan Lee as the winner of the second season of Sci Fi's Who Wants to Be a Superhero? Crippen aced a series of dynamic challenges to beat nine other contestants -

all while wearing spandex. And he's a genuinely nice guy, dedicated to using his alter ego for good - in part by raising money for breast cancer research. When the Defuser's around, bad guys are going down!

8) Misreported Murder Forty-year-old David Morales was beaten to death on June 19, just after work, when a minor accident set off a parking lot dispute and amateur boxer Kurtiss "Lucky" Colvin allegedly dropped Morales with a single punch. Thanks to sloppy local reporting

and madman Bill O'Reilly, the story played nationally as a crime either perpetrated or ignored by a crowd of Juneteenth revelers neither was true.

- 9) APD Neutralizes Clinic Bomb Twentyseven-year-old Paul Ross Evans, perhaps delusional, was sentenced to 40 years in the federal pen for planting a nail-packed pipe bomb outside the Austin Women's Health Center in April. Thanks to the quick response and technical abilities of the APD's bomb squad - plus agents with the ATF and FBI - the bomb, inside a soft-sided cooler, was defused without incident. The explosion could have proved deadly to anyone within a 100-foot radius.
- 10) Cruz Family Files Federal Suit The family of 24-year-old Joseph Cruz, beaten and arrested by APD Officer Gary Griffin at an East Austin bus stop in 2006, filed in June a federal civil rights suit, claiming Cruz was the victim of excessive force, assault, false detention, and malicious prosecution. Cruz, a schizophrenic, had fallen asleep at the stop. Although Griffin was directed to wait for EMS, he poked Cruz until he reacted and then struck Cruz repeatedly with his baton even after paramedics tried to intervene. Griffin was fired in January, but in December an arbitrator gave him his job back, arguing in part that the APD's use-of-force training and policies are inadequate.

THE BIZARRE IDOLIZATION **OF REAGAN**



The real Reagan certainly doesn't deserve the heights of Mount Rushmore, but neither did he fall to the depth of today's extremists trying to claim his image.



AMERICA'S GAPING ECONOMIC DIVIDE

What happened to the good ol' American notion of the common good - the idea that we're all in this together, trying to build a strong, unified society by fairly sharing the economic gains that all of us help produce?

Oh, sure, we've always had the rich and the poor, but at least we've tried in the past to narrow that gap, recognizing that a cohesive democratic society - a morally secure society - is dependent on maintaining both a vibrant middle class and a broad perception of fairness. Today, the powers that be - both corporate and governmental – have abandoned all pretense of shared sacrifice, shared gains, and a shared future. The very, very rich are being made ever and ever richer, and they are sailing blithely away from the rest of us, no longer moored to America's egalitarian ideals.

The latest indicator of this extreme change in our nation's guiding ethic comes from FairEconomy.org, which analyzes CEO pay, perks, and pensions. Its latest survey finds the chieftains of Fortune 500 corporations averaged \$10.8 million each in pay in 2006 more than 364 times the annual paychecks of the average U.S. worker! On top of this, CEOs salted away an average of \$1.3 million in pension gains in 2006, and they averaged another \$438,000 in such freebies as personal travel on corporate jets, country-club fees, and even corporate payment of their taxes.

Well, asserts the CEO clique, we run huge corporations and are simply being paid accordingly. However, FairEconomy.org compared the 20 highest-paid U.S. chief executives to the 20 highest paid in Europe. The European chiefs took only one-third as much pay - even though they ran companies that generated \$19 billion more in sales than the U.S. companies.



A Primary Primer

Most people, even the highly intelligent ones, are incapable of taking seriously any fact or idea that doesn't satisfy them emotionally.

That, alas, is the weakness of democracy.

I don't say this from a perch of superiority – I too am one of democracy's weak links. I hate it when one of my pet notions is flatly contradicted by a fact or seriously undermined by an idea. I would rather vote my wishes than my reason. I may trust my car only to experienced mechanics, and I may trust my body only to experienced doctors, and I may want the kids I love to be taught only by qualified teachers - yet I too have entertained the notion that, in these dire times, inexperience may be the only right experience for the presidency. For who in their right mind wants more of the same? And who, in this media-saturated world where what might be called "the authority of the image" reigns supreme, doesn't fancy that merely the image of a woman in the Oval Office, or an African-American or even a populist, would cause fundamental change? It's an exciting (if somewhat ungrounded) concept. Might even be true, right? And that would be wonderful. Feels, to me, very satisfying emotionally. Yet once in the Oval Office, he or she must act. No way around that. And he or she will act upon his or her experience. In fact, people have no choice but to act upon their experience - or someone else's. Which is where fancy ends and the messy stickiness of life takes over.


All the ways that presidents screw up fall into two categories: domestic and foreign. Domestic screwups can be addressed, often fixed, by the next administration. But foreign screwups – which, as screwups go, are always the most catastrophic – hobble the next administration with severe limitations and often gruesome options.

Everyone makes mistakes, the experienced and inexperienced alike. The difference is dependence. Presidents inexperienced in foreign affairs must depend upon their advisers - and advisers usually have agendas. So the inexperienced John F. Kennedy listened to advisers and embarked upon the pathetically misplanned Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba. He fired those advisers, then heeded much better advisers the following year during the Cuban Missile Crisis, a life-or-death-of-the-world event that would probably not have happened but for the fiasco of the Bay of Pigs. Like Kennedy, George W. Bush was another foreign-policy virgin dependent upon experienced but agenda-crazed advisers. And if our next president is Barack Obama, John Edwards, or any Republican save John McCain, that person will take on the biggest foreign-policy mess in half a century utterly dependent if not on the kindness of strangers, then certainly on the expertise of people whom he hasn't had time to know well.

Lost in our election-year demolition derby of crashing head-on rhetoric, images shining and/ or dented, charge topped by countercharge, exaggeration answered by misstatement, and more poses than a runway line of high-fashion models – lost, I say, in the media battle of the bands that is an American election is a simple, humble question: What does a president do?

Just for fun, we'll imagine a president who behaves pretty much lawfully, that is, with the advice and consent of Congress and within the limits of presidential power as defined in the Constitution. So, what does a president do?

The president is commander in chief of the armed forces and is the only elected official empowered to conduct foreign policy, both in his or her own person or through secretaries and ambassadors whom he or she appoints. For about a century, foreign policy has usually become a president's prime function, whether that president likes it or not - events demand it, events that are always unpredictable. In addition, the president is called our "chief executive," his or her term of office is called an "administration," because it's the president's job to execute policy and to administer the largest organization in the world: the U.S. federal government. Just as importantly, the president initiates domestic change, partly through the (overestimated) "bully pulpit" and mostly through prioritizing economic resources and sponsoring legislation. Put this way, it sounds unromantic, even dry. Put any way, it's a lot of work and a mind-boggling responsibility.



Ideally, to be qualified for the presidency, one needs, first and foremost, hands-on familiarity with foreign affairs and, almost as importantly, skills in administration and the crafting of legislation. Presidents can't administer everything, but they must know what complex administration requires when delegating people to do it for them. Presidents don't write the legislation they submit to Congress, but they'd better understand the small print or be at the mercy of their crafters. That's the nuts and bolts of the job.

Would you want to take on that job without sufficient experience? I sure wouldn't. I can only marvel at the ego of anyone who would and wonder more at that person's grasp of reality.

In this election, for the first time, it's possible for a citizen to hit the Internet and view the candidates' records on websites, Wikipedia, and congressional documents (national and state). Try it. Here's pretty much what you'll find.

Foreign affairs: No Republican candidate but John McCain has any experience worth mentioning, and most of that comes from his 22 years in the military, plus dealing with foreign affairs during his two terms as a congressman and 21 years in the Senate. (McCain is the ranking member of the Senate Committee on Armed Services, but that's not quite a hands-on foreignpolicy job.) On the Democratic side, Barack Obama has served only a year on the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations (his second year as senator, he's been running for president and hasn't put in much time on his job). John Edwards and Dennis Kucinich have no experience save voting for or against this or that. Hillary Clinton has her experience as first lady (whatever that was) and the near-but-not-quite experience of serving on the Senate Committee on Armed Services and the U.S. government's Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe.





On the other hand, Chris Dodd was in the Peace Corps in Latin America for two years, speaks fluent Spanish, and is considered an expert on Latin American affairs; in addition, he's served on the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations. Bill Richardson has been our ambassador to the United Nations and has been nominated four times for the Nobel Peace Prize(!), partly in recognition of his successful diplomatic efforts in (prewar) Iraq, North Korea, Cuba, and the Sudan. And Joe Biden has long been on the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations and has authored studies and analyses on missile defense, homeland defense, Putin's policies, bioterrorism, Afghanistan, HIV/AIDS, and homeland security. Biden, Richardson, and Dodd are qualified – as the others clearly are not - for the most important responsibility of the presidency.

Administration: Mitt Romney, Mike Huckabee, and Bill Richardson were or are governors; Rudy Giuliani and Dennis Kucinich were mayors. (Huckabee's record as governor is exceptional and surprising.) John McCain, Ron Paul, Duncan Hunter (Ann Coulter's choice for president), Barack Obama, Hillary Clinton, John Edwards, Joe Biden, and Chris Dodd have never administered anything larger than their offices - though it's fair to add that Clinton, McCain, Biden, and Dodd have especially extensive experience dealing with our federal bureaucracy, which is a president's main headache.

Legislation: In John Edwards' one term as senator, he left no lasting mark. Barack Obama is still a novice U.S. senator, but his record in the Illinois Legislature is generally impressive. In their various capacities, all the other candidates have wide experience as legislators, but Joe Biden's record stands out both for its range and its depth.

You can find serious blemishes on the records of every single one of 'em (as you can for anyone who's lived awhile and done much). More on that another time.

The most qualified are, in descending order: Joe Biden, Bill Richardson, and Chris Dodd. A Hispanic will not be elected president in 2008, so Richardson is out. In terms of achievement and hands-on experience across the board in what a president needs to know, Joe Biden and Chris Dodd are head and shoulders above the others.

But, as a country, we don't care too much about that, do we?

The Future Is Here

In 2007, that distant tomorrow when Austin's arts dreams would be realized finally arrived

For years, folks in the cultural community have talked about "the day when," as in the day when the city gets its own performing-arts center, the day when a Downtown museum gets built, the day when the African-American and Mexican-American communities get their own cultural centers, and so on, and so on - the point being that once this or that project was finally completed, that would be the point when the Austin arts scene would really take off, would be recognized on the level of the Austin music scene, nationally and even internationally. The problem, however, was that so many of these projects took so many years to be realized - delayed by troubles marshaling public will, city support, or funding - that "the day when" always seemed to be some distant tomorrow, barely visible in the city's future.

But in 2007, we saw one of the oldest of those projects - the Mexican American Cultural Center, 30 years in the making - finally open and with it the opening of Salvage Vanguard Theater's first home venue in 13 years of producing theatre and Ballet Austin's Butler Dance Education Center, a spacious Downtown facility that finally frees it from the cramped quarters of its longtime home on Guadalupe. With the Long Center for the Performing Arts set to open next spring and the completion of the Blanton Museum of Art due next summer, it became clear that "the day when" was no longer this vague out there; it was here.

Of course, one could argue that the Austin arts scene has been taking off for quite some time, and the year offered more evidence of that: loads of recognition on the national scene (Lawrence Wright and Steven Tomlinson both taking homegrown one-man shows to New York in the spring, the local visual-art scene being profiled in Art in America magazine, the Ransom Center acquiring David Mamet's archives, the city's prominent participation in the yearlong national theatre event 365 Days/365 Plays) and increasingly, on the global scene (Austin Lyric Opera staging the U.S. premiere of Philip Glass' new opera, Waiting for the Barbarians; the Rude Mechs taking Get Your War On to Finland and Edinburgh, Scotland; Conspirare getting picked up by the Harmonia Mundi label and being invited to the 2008 World Symposium on Choral Music in Copenhagen, Denmark).

Still, 2007 seemed to offer more of a sense that Austin's arts community was coming to the end of one era and beginning another. Part of that came from the loss of several longtime legends on the scene: performers Karen Kuykendall and Joe York, drama teacher Ruth Denney, artist and art teacher Gibbs Milliken. Part of it came from the changes in institutions of long standing: the closing of pioneering Fire Island Hot Glass Studio and Sharir + Bustamante Danceworks, the reinvention of the 50-year-old Austin Fine Arts Festival as Art City Austin, and the departure of more than a dozen cultural leaders from organizations and institutions they had worked with for years (see "Monumental Shift," Dec. 28). Part of it came, too, from an influx of new players in those same organizations and institutions and a major effort throughout the entire year by cultural advocates, artists, and arts administrators across the community (including this writer), who have been hard at work on CreateAustin looking at the next 10 years and what we want the arts scene to grow into.

It all points to the old days of waiting for dream projects to be finished being over. We may not have the flying cars, but the future has arrived.

TOP 10 (PLUS ONE) THEATRICAL TREASURES **AND PLEASURES OF 2007**

1) Present Laughter (Zachary Scott Theatre Center)

"I've been to a marvelous party," sang Noël Coward once upon a time, and that was my thought after seeing Dave Steakley's high-gloss, high-spirited revival of this Coward comedy. Cliff Simon's set and Susan Branch's costumes had style to burn, the cabaret numbers were intoxicating, and the comic verve of the cast - led by an uproarious Jamie Goodwin, giving a master class in theatrical vanity - left me positively elated. Propriety should keep me from including the show on this list, much less leading off with it - my wife was in the cast, and I worked with Goodwin on a Zach show later in the year - but I honestly didn't have a better time in the theatre in 2007.

2) Full Circle (Mary Moody Northen Theatre)

Dramatist Chuck Mee hijacked Brecht's Chalk Circle for a mad jovride across reunified Germany, and director David Long put the pedal to the metal. With a student cast in high gear and game guest Jill Blackwood leading the pack as a dizzy socialite, the St. Ed's show raced along like a BMW on the autobahn, its scenes and riotously inventive bits of staging flying by.

3) Funnyhouse of a Negro (Austin Community College **Drama Department/ProArts Collective)** Few directors could - or would care to - rescue Adrienne Kennedy's one act from obscurity; its knotty exploration of racial identity, spun in a feverish dreamscape, might seem best left to the Sixties. But Marcus McQuirter's resurrection of this bold work proved that its nightmare visions still have the power to disturb and to make us think. The year's most potent show, with a compelling performance by Feliz Dia McDonald.

4) Elephant's Gravevard

(UT Department of Theatre & Dance) The grim, if unlikely, execution of a circus animal in the Old South serves as the foundation for George Brant's new drama, which plays like an oral history - all interwoven monologues in past tense - but the vivid writing, coupled with Laura Kepley's deft staging, made the fate of Mary the elephant immediate and heartbreaking.

5) Take Me Out (Zachary Scott Theatre Center) This smart, savvy baseball drama reminded us that no individual's actions are without ramifications for the team, and Zach's tightly directed production - Dave Steakley again reminded us that theatre is also a team sport. All-star ensemble work and a Hall of Fame turn by Martin Burke as an accountant newly besotted with baseball.

6) Big River (TexARTS) TexARTS made good on its vow to mount quality productions of classic musicals with this all-singin', all-dancin' Huckleberry Finn. Rousing music, a lively cast, and Daniel Adams lighting up the entire Paramount stage as Mark Twain's irrepressible hero made rollin' on the river a rollicking joy.

7) Macbeth (Actors From the London Stage)

Something wondrous this way came when five players from Shakespeare's homeland visited to present his darkest tragedy. Shifting smoothly among characters on a bare stage, this masterful quintet seized the cursed play by the throat, pierced its haunting text, and let it bleed.





8) Fefu and Her Friends (UT Department of Theatre & Dance) Rooted as it is in Seventies feminism and theatrical experimentation, Maria Irene Fornes' drama might have come off as dated, but the commitment of eight strong UT actresses and Leslie Swackhamer's staging, especially in the intimate scenes staged around the Winship Building, drew us into the characters' lives and made these women matter.

9) Liz and Ann Hampton Callaway/Faith Prince (Austin Cabaret Theatre) Six years in, Stuart Moulton's gift of cabaret keeps on giving, lavishing Austin with more and more exquisite singers in a setting that has them as close as your heartbeat. This year, enchanting jazz chanteuse Ann Hampton Callaway made a welcome return with Broadway-belting sister Liz in tow for her first visit; they blended their varied styles into a creamy, dreamy sound that just melted you. Also new to town was another Broadway baby, Faith Prince, whose powerhouse voice, stunning control, and cheery good humor made every number blaze like the sun.

10) Ashes, Ashes (UT Department of Theatre & Dance) A fable about the dangers of pollution and forgetting set in a Seussian universe, Eve Tulbert's new play was brought to life with wildly fanciful design work and inventive staging by Dustin Wills. The result: a triumph of imagination and a world like no other onstage this year.


11) Voices Underwater (Salvage Vanguard Theater) Drenched in atmosphere and history, this Abi Basch drama was a ghost story of the Old South to steep in. The dense script required time to absorb, but moody design work and Jenny Larson's resourceful direction got its spooky vibe under our skin right away and for good.

TOP 10 DANCE AND CLASSICAL MUSIC WONDERS OF 2007 BY ROBERT FAIRES

1) Waiting for the Barbarians (Austin Lyric Opera)

Mounting the American premiere of a new opera by Philip Glass in Austin was a coup for ALO, but what made this a still greater achievement was the production's enveloping atmosphere of suspense and impending violence, which spoke powerfully to life in a time of oppression and terror. A timely call to recover our humanity, stunningly realized and anchored with expansive humanity by baritone Richard Salter.


- 2) Crossing the Divide Closing Gala Concert (Conspirare,
- et al.) How often are we blessed to hear hundreds of voices bound together in song and a love of song? The grand finale of Conspirare's National Endowment for the Arts-funded symposium on American music saw 14 choirs massed in the Riverbend sanctuary, and their voices lifted together was a mighty joy, as expansive as our nation's spacious skies and as stirring to the heart.
- 3) Faces of America: The Light (Miró Quartet) Pushing beyond the holy trinity of Copland, Gershwin, and Sousa, the UT School of Music's resident string quartet assembled a program of musical works that evoked the best aspects of our national character - our openness, our industry, our optimism - and performed them with a spectacular virtuosity matched by an exuberant intensity.
- 4) Illumination (Blue Lapis Light) Venturing indoors for the first time in years, site-specific choreographer Sally Jacques, her team of trusted designers, and her amazing corps of aerial dancers transformed the massive beams and vast emptiness of the decommissioned Seaholm Power Plant into a grand temple, a sacred space in which the spirit was free to soar toward heaven.
- 5) The King & I (Forklift Danceworks) In a comeback special to rival Elvis', Allison Orr's choreographic tribute to the man, the legend, rocked even harder than in its earlier versions. Dancers Orr, Theresa Hardy, and Ann Berman channeled the King in all his signature moves - as did Presley impersonator Donnie Roberts - and, with wit and heart, revealed the connection to Elvis in all of us.
- 6) The Odyssey (Austin Children's Choir) Adapting the heroic saga into an hourlong choral piece for kids was its own amazing journey, but composer Graham Reynolds, librettist Beverly Bardsley, and choir Artistic Director Kathleen Turner brought the epic by Homer home with a skill Odysseus would have envied. A splendid adventure, sailing on captivating rhythms and melodies and the choir's very fine singing.
- 7) Russian program (Austin Symphony Orchestra) Like a series of nesting dolls, ASO's October expedition to Russia revealed a succession of delights - Stravinsky! Khachaturian! Liadov! Borodin! - each more enchanting than the last. Concertmaster Jessica Mathaes proved herself a master of



the Khachaturian Violin Concerto, her quicksilver bowing flashing keenly expressed emotion that always found its mark.

- 8) Threshold of Night: Music of Tarik O'Regan (Conspirare) Artistic Director Craig Hella Johnson has found a kindred spirit in young Brit composer O'Regan, and in the season opener, given over entirely to O'Regan's work, he guided his company of voices to moments of ecstatic joy and serene stillness that proved O'Regan's worth as a composer and let us hold infinity in the curl of our ears.
- 9) Expressions/Lingo (American Repertory Ensemble) Both programs by this ambitious company balancing chamber music and dance offered double the pleasure, double the fun of many concerts in either discipline, the latter owing to the dazzling craft of performers in executing exacting works (Balanchine, Brahms, et al.), the former to the playfulness of the modern dances and co-founder/choreographer David Justin.
- 10) Flash Dance (Kathy Dunn Hamrick Dance Company)/ **Dolly Would (Getalong Gang Performance Group)/Night** of Spank Dance Company (Hot September Flurries) In an exceptionally fine year for Austin's independent choreographers and smaller dance companies, these three shows - a program of 30 dances in 60 minutes, a giddy tribute to the music and philosophy (!) of Dolly Parton, and a sly look at group dynamics among a few identically dressed women proved especially well how inventive and playful local dance makers are and how exhilarating they make it to watch.

Special Honorable Mention: The Souls of Our Feet (Tapestry Dance Company) The program of meticulously recreated tap routines from classic films and vaudeville - No. 2 on our Top 10 list for 2006 - was revived in March and proved every bit as delightful and awe-inspiring - and an achievement for Tapestry – as in its debut.









1) "City Folk" (1906 Gallery) The first solo show by painter Christa Palazzolo featured 3-footby-4-foot oil portraits of her friends in the Big Apple, rendered in formal compositions and with such stunning realist precision that it made me want to shake my sense of aesthetics like a Polaroid picture. That Roberto Ainslie's 1906 has had to call it guits after only a year of smart exhibits makes me want to shake my head.

2) "Wait and Hope" and "Restless Timber" (Volitant Gallery) This two-woman show, displaying Katy O'Connor's gorgeously life-sized slices of human life in oil on paper and Jennifer Drummond's brush-and-ink portraits of leafless oaks in all their wracked configurations, was a canny pairing of resonant beauty, a study in the contrasts of color and monochrome. And now Volitant's gone, too; more's the pity.

3) A Thought in Three Parts (Rubber Repertory) Rubber Rep brought Wallace Shawn's previously "untouchable" play from the Seventies - featuring a middle section with more extreme sexual hijinks than a "Ron Jeremy Live at Fuckfest '82" highlights reel - to the stage fully realized, treating all parts of the triptych with unerring accuracy. Funniest goddamn thing I've seen in years, and it reportedly brought playwright Shawn (in town to attend the opening) to tears with its excellence.

4) Thom Pain (based on nothing) (Hyde Park Theatre) Do you like magic? Hyde Park Theatre's Ken Webster garnered an Austin Critics Table Award for Outstanding Acting in a Leading Role for his performance of this Will Eno monologue, of course, as the man's fierce acting skills and sense of timing served up a pitch-perfect rendition of the character's funny, thoughtful, pained, and poignant ramble through modern life and personal history.

5) Present Laughter (Zachary Scott Theatre Center) Director Dave Steakley found the perfect man for the lead in this Noel Coward comedy: Jamie Goodwin, joyously overpowering the show as a sort of William Shatner for the Jazz Age in his embodiment of stage actor and epicenter of contumely, Garry Essendine. A fine supporting cast with impeccable blocking and timing made this old-school sitcom a laugh-out-loud pleasure.

6) Salvage Vanguard Theater finally gets a space of its own Sure, original Artistic Director Jason Neulander is releasing the reins after more than a decade of eclectic spectacles but not

before having overseen the opening of SVT's own bricks-and-mortar venue on the Eastside, complete with offices, two separate performance spaces, artists' studios, and a visual-arts gallery that's already presented - surprise! - some of the best artists in the country.

7) Little Stolen Moments Yes, your humble reporter produced the first full-length show by Lindsey Taylor, Nicole Whiteside, and Stanley Roy Williamson, but he would not have been inspired to had he not seen the song-and-dance power trio, whether on their trademark minitrampolines or off, explode viewers' expectations with kinetic wit and beauty. The gangly singer's got a ukulele and a voice like a backwoods angel, and he and the two lithe foxes with him dance in sync like Kraftwerk as retrained by Paula Abdul: This was the spectacle at Hyde Park Theatre that had audiences howling for more.

8) Backpack Picnic The comic geniuses David Bewley and Mitch Baker, formerly known as the Edmund Bulldogs, rebounded from an MTV rejection by grabbing Austin improvisers Shannon McCormick and Jeremy Lamb to help create an ongoing collection of brilliant sketches for nascent Internet powerhouse ON Networks. Expertly captured by video wunderkind Rene Pinnell, these slices of gonzo marzipan are a perfect snack for the hyperintelligent and ultrasilly.

9) Golden Arm Trio's The Tick-Tock Club CD release Composer/bandleader Graham Reynolds and his stellar coterie of musicians had the ghost of Dmitri Shostakovich walking Spanish through Memphis and gangland Chicago with strings and percussion and brass, then indulged themselves (and a thoroughly rocked crowd at the Mohawk) in the snazziest version of Duke Ellington numbers this side of iazz heaven.

10) The Alamo reborn The Alamo Drafthouse Cinema Downtown closed its location on Colorado and moved while we all waited with Norman Batesed breath, to the old (and now fully revamped) Ritz, bringing with it not only the usual uncanny cinematic treats conjured by Tim and Karrie League and their film-obsessed friends but live performances like the Dionysium and Master Pancake Theater. If you think of it as an oasis, as a mecca, would you also consider the frat rats along Sixth Street to be insurgents? Hold your fire.

TOP 3 VISUAL-ARTS STORIES FOR 2007

1) Austin galleries and artists get national press! Fine artists in Austin and the galleries that represent them are getting a level of national press coverage that bodes well for the future. The Austin Museum of Art, Arthouse, the Blanton Museum of Art, the Texas Biennial, Lora Reynolds Gallery, D Berman Gallery, and others were included in a seven-page "Report From Austin" in the December issue of Art in America. Art Palace was in The New York Times Magazine and Art in America articles, then traveled to Art Basel Miami Beach where it made ArtForum.com. Michael Sieben got on the cover of Juxtapoz Art & Culture Magazine in October, and they printed double covers for him. Matthew Rodriguez was called a "sculptural tour de force" in The New York Times after participating in the Deitch Projects spring Art Parade. There are other artists' achievements that I'm not including here, but these listed I felt vicarious happiness for.

2) James Housefield has a ton of energy! The adjunct curator of the Austin Museum of Art and Texas State University professor is earnest and knowledgeable about art, without forcing his ideas down your throat. He's an excellent lecturer, with an infectious peppiness. Watching him guide a tour through Robert Long's office art collection was interesting; Mr. Long liked it, as did everyone else on the tour, and both were very frank and confident speakers.

Without talking down to anyone, Housefield proved to have an encyclopedic knowledge of the basic Postimpressionist French collection. Housefield straddles his responsibilities as a teacher and curator with grace, charming all he meets. He treats AMOA collectors and board members, local galleries, students, and artists with equal respect. The things that most impress me are his open-minded attitude and the way he's so responsive, quick on his feet, and approachable. He forwards e-mails - "thought this would interest you," and they always do. This guy works hard, long days helping to educate all of us on ways to discover new art issues. 3) R.I.P. Volitant Gallery and taking it to the next level Artists Xochi Solis and Sean Gaulager were thrown into their jobs as curators and managers of Volitant Gallery, and just as quickly as their jobs appeared, they disappeared. But before Volitant closed in October, these two worked hard, and they were able to pull together a great season of programming and some diverse and bright special events. They ran videos, concerts, and tours and hosted receptions that lit up Fourth and Congress. Gaulager helped start Cantanker magazine, as well as edit and distribute it this year. He's shown his own art in Marfa and at Else Madsen Gallery in Austin. The future looks bright for Solis, as she was

chosen for the show "New Art in Austin" at AMOA.

It Is What It Is The Year in Books

We're not big on listing by 10s on the Books page: it's too much to expect our reviewers (none of whom count this as a day job) to winnow down to 10 when they've barely had a chance to read a half-dozen. Hell, we hardly knew what books were until the Chronicle called us home from an unhappy sojourn in Los Angeles (where the printed word is roundly dismissed; just ask the WGA), but we're pleased to announce that we've since come to know these wondrous inventions - pages numbered and cut. sometimes rough, sometimes smooth, and sammiched between two covers. We heartily recommend them.


It was mostly smooth waters in publishing this year - no single book sounded trumpets, no spectacular duds, either - but what we got were a few new additions to and from the pantheon and a smattering of sit-up-andlisten debuts.

Following last year's Everyman, Philip Roth continued his long goodbye (every new book feels like another adieu) with Exit Ghost (Houghton Mifflin), bookend to 1979's The Ghost Writer (see Jay Trachtenberg's year-end thoughts for more). Don DeLillo, whose archives have a home at the Harry Ransom Center, also visited mortality in Falling Man (Scribner), what some critics called the most significant 9/11 novel to date.

There were new works from the new old guard - the ones not vet canonized but certainly waiting in the wings. Denis Johnson, who regularly moonlights at local universities, won the National Book Award for his Vietnam novel Tree of Smoke (Farrar Straus and Giroux). Michael Chabon took a cue from Roth in the "what if?" subgenre of historical speculation with The Yiddish Policemen's Union (HarperCollins). The always-reliable Richard Russo came out with a doorstop of a novel. Bridge of Sighs (Knopf). And Ian McEwan's slim meditation on sexual repression. On Chesil Beach (Nan A. Talese), was elegantly crafted but felt like an awful tease.

The new new guard announced itself with Junot Díaz's spark plug of a novel. **The Brief Wondrous Life of Oscar** Wao (Riverhead Hardcover), which artfully weaved comic book lore with Dominican history and weaved in and out of

Spanish, no less (Belinda Acosta's got more to say about that). And Rudolph Delson's sweetish Manhattan romancer Maynard and Jennica (Houghton Mifflin) read like a 304page blueprint for next year's arthouse romcom, so it shouldn't surprise anyone that it was optioned while still in galleys.




On the nonfiction front, our personal favorites numbered two: The **Braindead Megaphone** (Riverhead Trade) and The New Kings of Nonfiction (Riverhead Books). The first - from fiction writer George Saunders, who wooed audiences at November's Texas Book Festival with his dead-sexy mix of corduroy and wry - was a collection of essays kicked off by a couldabeen-dour piece decrying public apathy that read instead like a rousing call to action. The second, edited by Our Man in Chicago Ira Glass, was a far-ranging compendium of the past 20 years' best feature writing (Susan Orlean's sly

but weighty "The American Man. Age 10." from 1992, is a miniature masterwork). Best yet, proceeds from the book benefit 826 Chicago, whose mission is to encourage youths to embrace the written word. Reading. We hear it's fundamental.

The Pleasure of **Your Company**

As a writer, you can't help studying other writers' work, even when reading for pleasure. But there are those writers who draw you into their prose with such skill.



you don't pause to critique; you just keep reading. Manuel Muñoz's short-story collection The Faith Healer of Olive Avenue (Algonquin) and Junot Díaz's novel The Brief Wondrous Life of Oscar Wao are two of those books. Muñoz's fearless short stories about small, defining moments of heartache are almost unbearable. But don't be put off: His elegant prose and knack for selecting those poignant moments are alchemic. Diaz's novel - about a painfully nerdy Dominican American, a curse, and his family and friends making their way in working class New Jersey - also has its share of heartbreak, leavened by well-placed guffaws. An unconventional narrative style, using footnotes for historical and anecdotal commentary, and an omniscient narrator who later reveals himself (the foul-mouthed yet strangely appealing Yunior) may unsettle narrative purists and the generally straight-laced. Still, it's a dazzling read that's hard to put down. - Belinda Acosta

Food Stuffs

Because this is the year the locavore movement found traction in our cultural consciousness. I would be remiss



if I didn't applaud Barbara Kingsolver's Animal, Vegetable, Miracle (HarperCollins), a memoir - co-authored by Kingsolver's husband and daughter - of a family that dined on the fruits of its labor for a year. Taking a longer historical view is former New York Times food critic Molly O'Neill's exhaustive

American Food Writing: An Anthology With Classic Recipes (Library of America), which surveys more than a century of writings on

everything from the virtues of growing one's own dinner (Nathaniel Hawthorne) to the immigrant's version of takeout meals (Jhumpa Lahiri). Monica Pradhan puts a diasporic spin on chick-lit with The Hindi-Bindi Club (Bantam Books), which follows three Indian-American mother-daughter dyads as they negotiate the tensions of old and new worlds via the exchange and preparation of beloved recipes. Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows (Scholastic) was the perfect goodbye to a beloved boy hero, and Mo Willems' Knuffle Bunny Too (Hyperion) is a triumph of visual and narrative creativity. - Melanie Haupt

I Shall **Anoint You** the Awesomest of the Year!

Not necessarily the best but definitely the most interesting and entertaining book of the year, I Shall **Destroy All the Civilized Planets!**



(Fantagraphics) introduced a new generation to largely forgotten artist Fletcher Hanks' strange work. Soon after the April 1938 premiere of Superman in Action Comics No. 1, new publishers sprang up and needed content for the suddenly popular comic book. Almost anyone who could draw landed a job in the burgeoning industry. During this mad scramble, Hanks, who obviously understood little about anatomy, began publishing oftencrude but always-dynamic stories in a variety of obscure publications such as Fantastic, Jungle, Fight, and Big Three Comics. The outlandish stories usually featured intergalactic protectors who meted out justice and vengeance upon the guilty like some cosmically powered Shadows. Complete with Paul Karasik's insightful, illustrated afterword, the fascinating and somewhat freakish I Shall Destroy All the Civilized Planets! successfully rescues Hanks from the purgatory of forgotten creators and restores his rightful place among the pantheon of the bizarre.

Inspiration, Melancholy

Norton) may not exactly tread new ground in the study of the ongoing crisis of politics and religion in America, but the book does tread that ground with an admirable mixture of sympathy and directness. And since the book got good reviews elsewhere, I'll give a quick shout-out to my friend Brian Groh, whose warm and funny debut novel, Summer People (Harper Perennial), makes

Great Man/ Great Woman

The best book I read that came out this year was Kate Christensen's

The Great Man

(Doubleday). Never having read Christensen's previous works, novels (In the Drink, Jeremy Thrane, The Epicure's



vear was the satirical Incredible Change-Bots (Top Shelf), good old Jeffrey Brown's homage to/parody of Transformers. Words that come to mind: hilarious (!), genius (!), more than meets the eye (!). I'm currently plowing my way through Laura Warholic or, the Sexual Intellectual (Fantagraphics), a new novel by Alexander Theroux, released just at the tail end of 2007. This hunk (at nearly 900 pages) of satirical anachronistic literature is shaping up to be a fine piece of writing and a good lesson in elaboration. Nine-hundred pages, remember? - Sofia Resnick

Thanks for the Memories

Philip Roth's Exit Ghost is the concluding chapter in his nine Zuckerman books. Confronting medical problems and memory loss, Roth's alter ego Nathan Zuckerman returns to NYC and is quickly swept up in a



vortex of interconnected relationships that confront themes of aging, friendship, and lust. At times brilliantly insightful but also painfully frustrating. Michael Chabon's The Yiddish Policemen's Union vividly creates the frozen enclave of Sitka, Alaska, where post-Holocaust Jews have settled since Israel lost its War of Independence in 1948. Part hardboiled detective mystery, meditation on living in exile, love story, and chess puzzle, Chabon's noirish narrative and memorable characters make this a real delight. Honorable mentions: House of Meetings (Random House), Martin Amis' tale of two brothers' love triangle and harrowing survival in a Stalin-era gulag, and You Don't Love Me Yet (Doubleday), Jonathan Lethem's touching, humorous look at love among indie-rock scenesters in L.A. Guilty pleasure: Marking the 40th anniversary of the Summer of Love by re-reading Tom Wolfe's The Electric Kool-Aid Acid Test (Bantam) ... still hilarious and psychedelic.





Virginia B. Wood's **Best Bites of 2007**

SWEET BITES:

Chocolate Peach Nectar-Filled Chocolates Lecia Duke's melt-in-your-mouth delicacies were a real revelation - the perfect burst of Hill Country summer flavor on the tongue.

Homemade Butterfingers at Jasper's The pastry chef was generous enough to share the recipe after I raved about this candy in print. It could be dangerous now that I know how to make these crunchy peanut-butter nuggets enrobed in semi-

Caramel Semi-Freddo With Salted Almond Croquant & Blackberry Syrup at Asti Pastry chef Amanda Rockman created this distinctive dessert for Asti's early fall menu, offering a lovely balance of sweet, tart, and salty flavors with crisp and creamy textures. We will miss her work now that she's returned to Chicago in search of fine-dining fame.

Brazos Supreme Goat's Milk Coffee Ice Cream With Miles of Chocolate The folks at Wateroak Farm near Bryan make many wonderful flavors of ice cream with their superior goat's milk. Folding chunks of Miles of Chocolate into some of the flavors amounts to gilding the proverbial lily, but it sure tastes great!

Peppermint Gelato at Teo's Some time ago, I gave Matt Lee a few bags of the peppermint-stick candy we use to make my sister's favorite birthday ice cream, and this refreshingly subtle pink gelato was the ultimate result: in a word, marvelous.

Fresh Fruit Fried Pies With Ice Cream at Lamberts Downtown Barbecue The fresh-fruit fillings change with the seasons - blackberries, peaches, pears in vanilla syrup, apples, etc. - but these babies are always the perfect chaser for a plate of fancy barbecue.

Bombolini at Trattoria Lisina Delightfully decadent Italian cake doughnut holes dusted with cinnamon sugar are served warm with bowls of honey for dipping. Jerry Pizzitola has promised to teach me how to make these, and I can't wait.

Peanut Pay Bars at the Cookie Jar Judy Marts tops crisp shortbread with salted peanuts and rich, buttery caramel for an elegant version of a favorite childhood treat.

Dark Chocolate Chipotle Fritos From Tempt Chocolates Chocolatier Ginger Berryhill drizzles high-quality dark chocolate over spicy, salty corn chips, with addictive results.

Strawberry Lemonade at Mighty Fine Burgers Freshly squeezed every day, this sweet/tart refresher is my favorite fruit beverage of the year. I'd like to have a gallon on hand at

Collette would be proud of Aquarelle's Terry Wilson, Jeffrey's Alma Alcocer, Austin's BBQ's Marisela Godinez, Stortini's Kristen Kittrel, and Fête Accompli's Quincy Adams-Erickson, among other successful Austin women chefs.

"What are corn dogs?" - François. "Cheap sausages dipped in batter and deep-fried. You know? American." - Chef Skinner

Ah yes, American cheap sausages, but not deep-fried. Make mine on a toasted bun topped with yummy condiments, like the ones from Best Wurst or Dog Almighty.

SAVORY BITES

Peach Slices Wrapped in Venison Prosciutto With Hill Country Chèvre and Texas Chipotle Honey From Hudson's on the Bend

This was Jeff Blank's offering at the Save Our Springs benefit and provided the most definitive taste of the Texas Hill Country all year. Shrimp & Grits at Jasper's Jasper's take on

this Carolina Low Country classic is masterful: a perfectly grilled, gigantic, sweet Gulf shrimp sits atop a puddle of creamy, cheesy, stoneground organic grits, surrounded by fresh corn kernels. Wow!

Lamb Delights I love lamb, and I found great examples of it everywhere I went this year -

the Roaring Fork served superior Lollipop Lamb Chops at the SOS benefit: we reveled in great lamb ribs at the original Cooper's Pit Bar-B-Q in Mason; the Texas Hill Country Dorper Association presented marvelous lamb meatballs at the Fredericksburg Food & Wine Festival; and the strolling gauchos at Fogo de Chão serve up perfectly spiced lamb chops and leg of lamb.

Lobster Bisque at the Falls Bistro If the quality of this voluptuous soup is any indication, this new bistro and wine bar in Marble Falls will become an important dining destination in the coming year.

Parmesan Popovers at TRIO at the Four Seasons Baskets of these enormous, soufflé-

like wonders were a big hit at the hotel's holiday preview luncheon in August. I predict the popovers will become a TRIO trademark.

Zucca Chips at NoRth Restaurant These innovative bar snacks were the most creative appetizers I tasted all year - whisperthin slices of zucchini squash are lightly battered and fried so as to just disappear in your mouth. Keep them coming.

Green Chile Truffle Mac & Cheese From Cafe Josie Chef/owner Charlie Maves brought this rich, elegant example of comfort food to the Green Corn Project benefit, and it was a big hit - easy serving and great eating. Roasted Salsa Ranch Dip This dip from HEB's Chef Prepared line of products is a

tasty match for crisp, fresh veggies or salty tostada chips.


Schnitzel With Artichoke Hearts and Lemon Spaetzle at the Welfare Cafe



MICK VANN: EXCELLENT DUMPLINGS I HAVE KNOWN IN 2007

Shanghai Chinese Restaurant, 6718 Middle Fiskville, 458-8088. Shrimp and leek dumplings: with sweet shrimp and leek in a steamed wrapper. Pan-fried dumplings: huge, nicely browned, with minced pork, scallion, and cabbage in a medium-thick pastry; they are the best in town. Shrimp roll in rice-pasta sheets (cheung fun): fresh rice pasta forming a rectangle with small shrimp. All wrappers are house-made and perfect.

Pao's Mandarin House, 2300 Lohman's Spur #134, Lakeway, 512/263-8869. Pan-fried dumplings are superb: thin wrappers encasing a chunky pork filling (and the dipping sauce is perfectly balanced, the best in town). Pao-Tze are large, dome-shaped pork dumplings with a unique sauce of tamarind, lots of ginger, soy, and black vinegar; they are excellent and radically different from the previous dumplings.

Asia Cafe, 8650 Spicewood Springs Rd. #115 (at Highway 183), 331-5780. Zhong dumplings are exquisite: Handmade pastry surrounds juicy pork, resting in a pool of sweet soy, chile and sesame oils, and loads of garlic. Spicy Wonton is a large bowl of long dumplings with pork sitting upon pea shoots, dripping with a spicy broth of sesame with scallion. Asia's roasted chile oil on the table is the best: incendiary and loaded with ma la (Sichuan peppercorns).

NG House, 6800 West Gate Blvd. #112, 416-9888. Pan-fried dumplings are outstanding: handmade pastry properly browned, containing a plump pork filling, accompanied by a nicely balanced soy-ginger sauce (and excellent chile paste). Spicy Wonton: a bowl of meaty dumplings perched atop a pool of garlic oil kissed with vinegar and garnished with sesame seeds.

China Palace, 6605 Airport, 451-7104. Hot and Spicy Wonton consists of shrimpand pork-filled wontons covered with a spicy red oil sauce, with a hint of vinegar and lots of garlic. Pan-fried dumplings are mincedpork packets, perfectly browned on the bottom, and served with a well-balanced gingery sauce.

Tâm Deli & Cafe, 8222 N. Lamar Ste, D-33, 834-6458. Steamed rice wraps (báhn cuôn) never fail to delight, especially the ground pork/black mushroom version that comes topped with slices of Tâm's homemade pork pâté, garnished with fried garlic, and along with a salad of cucumber slices and sprouts.

Golden Wok, 500 Canyon Ridge, 228-3688. A newbie from San Antone, with delightful shrimp har gau (fat steamed dumplings with tapioca flour skins), shrimp sui mai (wheat flour skins, shrimp within), and fun kwok pot stickers (pork, chicken, and shrimp filling). All first-rate.

MM PACK'S TOP 10 SANDWICHES OF 2007

Garlic and Herb Roasted Leg of Lamb. FoodHeads, 616 W. 34th, 420-8400. This essential Austin lunch spot is well-known for loaded and tasty sammies, which include design-your-own deli combos and grilled specialty sandwiches. The No. 1 draw for me is the luscious, garlicky, herby roast-lamb sandwich with slices of grilled eggplant and feta cheese, dressed with lettuce, tomato, and cucumber mayonnaise on a toasted ciabatta.

Soft Shell Crab Po'boy, Ms. B's Authentic Creole Restaurant, 1050 E. 11th, 542-9143. I'm a sucker for a fried-oyster po'boy, and there are good ones all over town, but Ms. B's lunchtime soft-shell crab po'boy trumps even the finest fried oysters. The crusty Louisiana-style bread roll is bursting with two crispy-on-the-outside, juicy-on-the-inside whole crabs, lettuce, tomato, and tartar sauce. Crab heaven on a bun.

El Cubano, Cafe Mangu, 15200 FM 1825, Pflugerville, 512/990-3121. A pan-Caribbean riff on an old Spanish standard, the Cuban sandwich was immortalized in Tom Russell's story-song of the same name: "It's got two kinds of pig, ham and roast pork, a slice of white cheese as long as your fork." Cafe Mangu's Dominican-born Alex Fernandez and Rafael Montes de Oca offer a terrific version served on the traditional oblong white roll, pressed and grilled on the plancha, with a side of addictive plantain chips. (The restaurant's name derives from "man, good!" - purportedly exclaimed in 1916 by invading American Marines about Dominican food.)

Gourmet Banh Mi, Lily's Sandwich, 10901 N. Lamar, 973-9479. Lily's in the new Chinatown Center does the Cuban sandwich one better. This Vietnamese baguette sandwich includes three kinds of pork cold cuts on a 10-inch roll, dressed with sliced fresh jalapeño, pickled carrot, daikon radish, cucumber, and cilantro, all for an astonishing \$2.75. Bang for the buck? Best deal in town.

Prosciutto Panini, Enoteca Vespaio, 1610 S. Congress, 441-7672. It's almost impossible to order something that isn't exceptionally satisfying at the informally Italian Enoteca Vespaio, but for something quite different, try the hotpressed panini of thinly sliced prosciutto, melty fontina cheese, arugula, and a softly sautéed egg, with just a hint of truffle. Decadent? Yes. Rich? Yes. Divinely delicious? Oh my, yes.

Vegetariano Panini Caldi. Mandola's Italian Market, 4700 W. Guadalupe, 419-9700. Mandola's at the Triangle serves some of the best hot paninis around, and the Vegetariano leads the pack of good choices. A variety of warm sliced and grilled Mediterranean vegetables in a pressed ciabatta rests under an oozv laver of mozzarella, singing a beautiful medley with the spicy additions of pepper relish, artichoke spread, and garlic aioli.

American Wagvu Corned Beef Reuben, Jasper's, 11506 Century Oaks Terrace, 834-4111. When you shell out \$14 for a sandwich, it better be pretty special. It's a splurge, but Jasper's in the Domain delivers with the meltingly tender and deeply flavorful Wagyu corned beef on rye bread adorned with real Russian dressing and slow-cooked choucroute instead of the standard, more strident sauerkraut. This is your classic deli Reuben puttin' on the ritz.

Shrimp and Avocado Tartine, Blue Dahlia Bistro, 1115 E. 11th, 542-5942. Tartine is French for open-faced sandwich, a specialty at Blue Dahlia, where each tartine is artfully presented on a wooden platter. Of the several arresting combinations, I'm particularly fond of the one with whole shrimp and avocado that's graced with tomato, mango salsa, and a little toasted nori for crunch, served on très fresh slices of whole-wheat bread from Mandola's bakeshop.

Fajita Ranchero Torta, Habanero Mexican Cafe, 501 W. Oltorf, 416-0443. In our local love affair with Mexican food, we tend to overlook tortas - sandwiches served on bolillos, small, white crusty rolls inspired by French baguettes. Habanero Cafe serves theirs with any of the delectable fillings that are available for their tacos - carnitas, barbacoa, tripas, lengua, carne guisada. It's hard to decide which is best, but the fajita ranchero torta is a great sandwich: a winning contrast of the white roll with very spicy beef skirt steak grilled with strips of onion and plenty of jalapeños. Not for the faint of palate - it's fiery.

Korean Bulgogi Burger, Burger Tex II, 2912 Guadalupe, 477-8433. I know I'm stretching the definition of sandwich here, but the bulgogi "burger" at Burger Tex II on the Drag is just too tasty to leave out. A hefty pile of thinsliced beef marinated in soy and sesame oil is grilled and heaped on a toasted bun. It's perfect as is, with no additional condiments except maybe a pickle or two.

KATE THORNBERRY'S **10 BEST SURPRISES OF 2007**

- 1) The Roasted Tomatillo Salsa Verde at ZuZu Handmade Mexican Food I really wasn't expecting to find my ideal green sauce at ZuZu. This salsa isn't just good; it is archetypal. It is the very essence of what salsa verde is meant to be: mild yet robust in flavor, complex, earthy, and unforgettable. I am thunderstruck that it has not (yet) won the Salsa Verde category in the annual Austin Chronicle Hot Sauce Festival.
- 2) I am astounded at the difference in quality between whole-leaf tea and mass-produced supermarket tea bags loed tea is my beverage of choice; I probably drink a gallon a day. Seriously. Discovering Tea Embassy (900 Rio Grande) and switching from grade Z teadust-in-a-bag to the fresh, sparkling, clear flavor of whole-leaf tea has made me a proselytizing convert.
- 3) I have been deeply surprised (and humbled) that a lifelong vegetable gardener like myself, who gardens in Central Texas (where few of the "temperate zone" rules apply) could actually be taught a thing or two by a damned Yankee gardener. The Way We Garden Now, by Katherine Whiteside, has become my No. 1 gardening book; I have bought more copies of it to give to friends than any other book this year.
- 4) I was very surprised to discover that when whole grains are sprouted prior to being baked into bread, they are transformed from (primarily) carbohydrate into 80-90% easily assimilated protein. I knew sprouted-grain bread is health-foody and "better for you"; I didn't realize that it changed its composition entirely! The sprouting process considerably enhances the food value of all grains, and if the sprouted-grain waffles and pizzas at DaVine Foods (1412 W. Oltorf) are any indication, sprouted grains are more satisfying and flavorful, too.
- 5) Absolutely the best surprise in the cookbook department: The Taste of Country Cooking, by Edna Lewis. Her insights concerning seasonal cooking and the local foodways of her childhood (now a hundred years distant) are so timely today that this has become the workhorse of my cookbook shelf. I am amazed I ever lived without it!
- 6) It was a shock to find out that, during times that Austin was innocent of any such establishment, Georgetown was enjoying authentic Italian pizza at Paisanos Pizza & Pasta - for more than a decade! "Old-coun-



try" Italian couple Rosa and Giuseppe Bebe are the genuine article: hardworking, elderly immigrants who would never dream of deviating a jot from traditional ways. Nowhere is this more evident than in the pizzas they make: From the buffalo mozzarella to the handmade meatballs, these pies are heaven on earth.

- 7) I was astonished to discover that restaurants can use compostable potato-starch "plasticware" and biodegradable takeout containers, as salad cafe Leaf does; it turns out we don't have to cover the earth with Styrofoam! C'mon, everybody: If we make a big enough fuss, maybe every other restaurant in town will follow suit. It has also been a surprise, and a pleasant one, that Leaf (419 W. Second) has managed to succeed, despite the fact that it is in the middle of a construction maelstrom.
- 8) I was surprised to find famous local brewmaster Brian Peters quietly plying his craft at Uncle Billy's Brew & Que (1530 Barton Springs Rd.). As a founding brewer at the Bitter End and Live Oak Brewery. Peters has long had a nearly cult following, and with good reason: His beers and ales are stellar and show a dizzying versatility. A longtime champion of Old World brewing methods, Peters is putting Austin back on the brewing map.

- 9) This sounds like a dig, but it really isn't: I was surprised that the sandwich counter at Whole Foods Downtown is such a good deal! The sandwiches cost around \$6, and they are fantastic. Premium cold cuts, European cheeses, a panorama of fresh ingredients, and speedy service; plus, sandwiches can be toasted on a hot press for no extra charge. Until I tried one, I just didn't get it; now I know why the sandwich counter always has the longest line.
- 10) Following up on the simple, self-generated press release about her book, Your Healing Diet. I was very surprised to learn that Deirdre Earls had, in a short period of time, already burgeoned to national prominence. What was intended to be a mention turned into a feature article, and I have no doubt that we'll be seeing Earls all over the TV in 2008.

WES MARSHALL'S 10 BEST WINES OF THE YEAR

Here's the best of what I tasted this year. A few - the Banfi, Chateau St. Jean, and Jadot - are widely available. My choices are evenly matched with five whites and five reds, but I had to throw in the Champagne that most lit my rockets this year. It's too good to miss.

Banfi Principessa Perlante Gavi (\$14) This is what the Italians call frizzante - a slightly sparkling wine. It is made from the white Cortese grape, which is pretty obscure to American tastes. Italians love it. So do I, and check that price!

Chateau St. Jean Fume Blanc (\$15) Chateau St. Jean has been on a roll for the last couple of years. Their high-priced wines have always been some of California's best, and often at a bargain compared to their competition. But it's down in the trenches at the budget level where these wines shine. If you like this one, try their equally yummy Chardonnay.

Domaine Davenne/Domaine les Temps Perdus Sauvignon de St. Bris (\$20) You'll have to order this wine from a specialty retailer. It's worth the trouble. This is one of the few Sauvignon Blancs legally allowed to grow in Burgundy. One taste, and you'll understand why French Sauv Blancs are the gold standard.

F.X. Pichler's Grüner Veltliner Smaragd "M" (\$70) This is another wine for which you'll have to romance your purveyor, and I admit it's steep for an Austrian white. But

once you get a perfumed whiff, feel the luxurious richness in the mouth, savor the bracing acidity, and then experience the five-minute finish, you'll understand.

Domaine Ponsot Morey-St.-Denis Premier Cru Clos des Monts Luisants Vieilles Vignes Blanc (\$50) Take your favorite wine purveyor a Christmas gift when you ask for a bottle of this Aligoté; it's not going to be easy to acquire. I've never tasted an Aligoté like this. The grape, widely planted in Eastern Europe, is also the second most planted white in Burgundy after Chardonnay. People love it for its lively acidity and apple-y citrus aromas. Very attractive and very powerful.

Jadot Fixin (\$27) Fine wineshops should either have this or be able to get it. If you like Pinot Noir but have been turned off by the astronomical prices of most Burgundies, here's your chance. I've tasted \$400 Burgundies that aren't this good.

Lolonis Mendocino Cabernet Sauvignon (\$30) Organically grown, lovingly tended, and very elegant for a California Cab, this wine whispers.

Château Génot-Boulanger, Mercurey (\$35) I judged in a Burgundy competition in New York earlier this year. After tasting 50 bottles of Pinot Noir in a double-blind shoot-out, this was my favorite.

Frank Family Napa Valley Zinfandel (\$32) Rich Frank used to run Disney. Now he sits high above the Napa Valley, surveying his vineyards and producing killer wines. This Zinfandel is one of his least-expensive bottles. It's a true Napa 7in, more restrained and controlled than its Sonoma brethren.

L'Arco Pario (\$55) If I had Michael Dell's money, one wine I'd be buying by the case would be Quintarelli Amarone, which runs about \$300. I don't, but once or twice a year, I don't mind swinging for a truly great wine like L'Arco Pario. They rest young grapes on the pressed skins of the Amarone, lending a bit of the flavor of the real thing. And L'Arco's winemaker had the blessing of the elder Quintarelli.

Ruinart Blanc de Blancs (\$70) If my Champagne collection had only Ruinart Blanc de Blancs and Bollinger, I would be perfectly satisfied. They play yin and yang, with Bollinger's dark, rich, toasty flavors offsetting the Ruinart's sunny brightness. I tried a lot of very expensive Champagnes this year. I'd buy this one over any other.

2007 opens up a vein of cinematic riches

A clear sign that 2007 was a good year for good films is that the compilation of these Top 10 lists seemed easier than usual. All too frequently, it's a strain to come up with 10 films that can be considered worthy of such lists. This year, however, a common complaint among Chronicle critics was that they had difficulty pruning their lists down to the 10 best. (One corollary of this phenomenon is that the 2008 home-rental market should benefit from this bounty of quality selections - at least in the first half of the year.)

Unsurprisingly, the only film to receive a vote from all five critics contributing lists this year - No Country for Old Men - is also the movie that scored the highest in the total compiled vote tally. Following in the No. 2 position is The Lives of Others, the only film to receive a vote from four out of five critics. FILM NEWS TOP 10 OF 2007

1) Television saved the film star

Friday Night Lights, we love you. We love your smart scripts, we love your great cast, and we love you even more for keeping our film crews (mostly) employed for two seasons, as the big Hollywood projects continue to swerve around us to New Mexico and Louisiana. Lights isn't alone. The CBS pilot Swingtown, about three swinging Seventies married couples living in the Chicago suburbs, also shot in Austin in 2007. And Dallas is feeling the love for Prison Break, which is calling the Metroplex home for a second straight year.

2) Strike that

We'd love those television series even more if they were actually shooting to start 2008. But the Writers Guild of America is on strike in a battle with producers to get a share of online sales. Who will flinch first? Will this drag into negotiations between producers and the Screen Actors Guild? Will late-night talk shows be funny without scribes? Will jaded audiences care? Stay tuned.

3) Texas gets friendly incentives

It's admittedly not as much as offered by New Mexico and Louisiana, but the Texas Legislature did approve a \$20 million film/video incentives program that is expected to bear fruit this year. The film industry united to form the Texas Motion Picture Alliance and to get the job done. But, thanks to Sen. Steve Ogden, it all comes with a rider prohibiting funding for projects that portray Texas in a negative light.

4) Spiro leads Austin's indie onslaught

Count **Ellen Spiro** as Austin's shining independent film star of 2007. Body of War, the University of Texas film prof's Iraq war saga, was named best documentary by the National Board of Review and is one of 15 docs short-listed for the Oscars. Expect the five noms to be announced Jan. 22. That wasn't all. Troop 1500, from Spiro and Karen Bernstein, took two Gracie Awards: the Outstanding Documentary-Long Format prize and Outstanding Director for Spiro.

5) Eska is a close second

Runner-up for shining star of the Central Texas film scene is Chris Eska, whose August Evening follows an aging, undocumented farmworker and his widowed daughter-in-law as their lives are turned upside down. It's a nominee for Film Independent's Spirit Awards' John Cassavetes Award for the best feature made for less than \$500,000. (The awards happen Feb. 23.) August Evening, which shot primarily in Gonzales, Texas, already won Eska the \$50,000 Target Filmmaker Award for Best Narrative Feature at the Los Angeles Film Festival. It's been picked up for theatrical release by Maya Entertainment. Also making waves are **Laura Dunn**, whose Austin environmental epic, The Unforeseen, is up for the Spirit Awards' Truer Than Fiction Award, and Jeff Nichols, whose Shotgun Stories, the tale of a feud between two sets of half-brothers after the death of their father, received the Narrative Feature Jury Award at the Austin Film Festival.

6) Putting on the Ritz

Here's betting the nexus of the 2008 South by Southwest Film Festival will be the Alamo Drafthouse at the Ritz. It seems like vesterday that Tim and Karrie League were wringing their hands over how to save the original Alamo Drafthouse amid rising Warehouse District rents. Poof, the original is history, and the Ritz has proudly taken its place. Save me a seat for SXSW, and preorder me a pizza and a thick chocolate milkshake.

7) Marfa, film capital of the world?

Last year I semijokingly opined that **Marfa** – which last knew fame when my Realtor pal Barb Dawson was an extra in Giant - was the new film capital of Texas after hosting the lensing of There Will Be Blood and part of No Country for Old Men. Now comes word that the Los Angeles Film Critics Association picked There Will Be Blood as the best film of 2007, while the New York Film Critics Circle chose No Country for Old Men. Oscars, anyone?

8) Pegged for mumbling

SXSW Film programmer Matt Dentler had a big hand in solidifying the low-budget, improvisational, talky film craze now dubbed mumblecore when he programmed and tub-thumped such entries as Joe Swanberg's winning Hannah Takes the Stairs (and other less-notables) at 2007's Fest. (SXSW has been rallying around Swanberg since screening his debut feature, Kissing on the Mouth, in 2005.) Then filmmaker Andrew Bujalski, who acted in Hannah, cemented the Austin connection by shooting his mumblecore follow-up to Mutual Appreciation here.

9) The horror! The horror!

Count 2007 as the year Fantastic Fest cemented its place as the self-described "best in new science-fiction, fantasy, horror, animation, crime, Asian, and all around badass cinema." During his keynote address at the International Film Festival Summit in Las Vegas. Variety Publisher Charlie Koones went so far as to include it on a list of "10 Film Festivals We Love." Meanwhile, the Weinstein Co. and Lions Gate jointly picked up the Austin-shot horror flick Teeth and its scary vagina dentata. Look for this horrific trend to continue with Fangoria's Weekend of Horrors convention, Jan. 18-20, at the Renaissance Austin Hotel, and the shooting of a Friday the 13th remake in the Austin area soon.

10) Stars! Stars! Stars!

Julia Roberts, Carrie-Anne Moss, Emily Watson, Willem Dafoe, Ryan Reynolds, and Hayden Panettiere. And that's just the cast list for Bastrop-shot Fireflies in the Garden. The tween set had to go to New Braunfels to watch twins Cole and Dylan Sprouse (The Suite Life of Zach and Cody) shoot Kings of Appletown. John C. Reilly played Stubb's - in character! - as his Walk Hard alter ego, Dewey Cox. All this in the same year People magazine closed its Austin bureau. Expect a paparazzi onslaught in 2008 if Brad Pitt and Sean Penn do indeed arrive for the filming of Terrence Malick's Tree of Life.



- 5) BioShock (PC, Xbox 360): The art direction alone puts it on the list.



Baby, You're Tops

If there's a common theme in this year's Top 10 TV, it's strong ensemble casts and vivid writing (go, writers!). Some of the most respected are among the least viewed, which only goes to show that just when you've given up on TV, something appears to renew your faith. That was especially evident this year with some of the most well-written works coming out in droves on the small screen. With that, here's the list:

- 1) Mad Men (AMC) I was mesmerized with this series from the beginning but confess to being slow to appreciate it. even though I tuned in week after week. Now, after watching the first season in its entirety, I believe this glorious drama is much more than a stylish period piece about the advertising business. It's a meditation on the present, offering the nagging but unasked question: Who are the people we say we are?
- 2) 30 Rock (NBC) So few TV comedies can make you laugh out loud, but this bright comedy manages to find unexpected laughs in the most outrageous moments. This year's jaw-dropping moment was Alec Baldwin as Jack Donaghy channeling Redd Foxx during Tracy Jordan's (Tracy Morgan) therapy session. Last year, it was Paul Reubens guest-starring as a member of an obscure royal family, the product of years of inbreeding (two words: ceramic hand). That was topped only by Jack and his ex (Isabella Rossellini) fighting over their Arby's franchise ("Damn you, Jack; you know how I love my big Beef 'n Cheddar"). Which gives 30 Rock the unexpected prize for the most obvious yet most entertaining use of product placement.




- 3) **Damages** (FX) Another superb cast, this one in a taut legal thriller starring Glenn Close. Ted Danson was marvelous as the soulless corporate tycoon, Arthur Frobisher, but the transformation of Ellen Parsons (Rose Byrne) from a reserved first-year lawyer into a calculating creature bent on revenge
- 4) The Riches (FX) The premise of this underappreciated series sounds preposterous: After accidentally running an affluent couple off the road, a family of professional drifters assumes the identities of the couple, bluffing their way into jobs, prestigious schools, and friendships. How they manage to keep up the hoax is what kept its woefully small audience watching. But its observation of class and the classic American reinvention tale is what makes this series much more than a fish-out-of-water story.
- 5) The Office (NBC) A great ensemble cast led by Steve Carell makes the dullest 9-to-5 job on earth worth revisiting, week after week.
- 6) Dirty Sexy Money (NBC) Ah, the self-absorbed and spoiled Darling family. How I love them. Just be happy you don't work for them. The allure and repulsion of excess is what drives

Nick George (Peter Krause) to continue to work for the Darlings, along with his need to get to the bottom of his father's mysterious murder. The murder-mystery is a disposable device. It's the Darling family antics (superbly led by Donald Sutherland and Jill Clayburgh) that make this series especially delicious.

- 7) Flight of the Conchords (HBO) Quirky with a capital "Q." The series about two clueless Kiwis trying to make it as musicians in New York is delightfully absurd. This is what HBO should have focused their attention on promoting instead of that wearisome John From Cincinnati. Songs with off-the-wall lyrics presented as low-rent music videos are simply delightful. Flight may be an acquired taste, but it's one well worth cultivating.
- 8) Extras (HBO) I'm a sucker for behind-the-footlights projects, and this is one of my favorites. Another series from the brilliant Ricky Gervais and Stephen Merchant ended this year, but the laughs endure. And only this team could pull off a two-hour series finale with just enough bite to remind us that stardom isn't everything.
- 9) Aliens in America (CW) Another overlooked gem, this series about a Muslim Pakistani foreign-exchange student living in Wisconsin (Adhir Kalyan as Raja) packs a larger punch than might be expected from a typical based-in-the-suburbs sitcom. While effortlessly lobbing barbed commentaries on U.S. isolationism, it still managed to be warmhearted without being too mushy, condescending, or dependent on the cheap laugh. 10) Friday Night Lights (NBC) I don't think you're allowed to live in Texas without showing some love to this struggling but still solid drama about the lives and loves of a small Texas town driven by football.

STATE OF THE UNION

Climbing up 10 spots from last year. Austin's C3 Presents ranked No. 13 among promoters on **Billboard**'s annual year-end list, pulling in \$32 million, nearly a third of which came from the 2007 Austin City Limits Music Festival. The booking and promotion enterprise hosted 494 shows (132 of them sellouts) for a total attendance of more than 815,000. In the same issue, Waterloo Records owner John Kunz offers some advice for labels: "Give up DRM [Digital Rights Management], accept reality, and acknowledge that the customer is always right. It's the ABCs of retail. The universe has changed, and we need to change. There is no terra firma out there; we are on a spinning log going down the river. And give us more vinyl."



WALL OF SOUND

Sliced and slowed, Paul Wall (I) christened the new, two-story **Club Fuse** (505 Neches) on Friday night. Playing to some 150 people, the People's Champ karaoked over a 25-minute mixtape of Houston staples, including "Sittin' Sideways," selections from 2007's Get Money, Stay True, and his lone verse on Chamillionare's "N Luv Wit My Money."

RADIO BIRDMAN

Ending one of the longest-running weekly residencies in town, News 8 Austin correspondent and Chronicle contributor Andy Langer is stepping down as host of The Next Big Thing on KROX, his 12-year, Sunday night mainstay responsible for four hours of new and local alternative music. Instead, Langer is switching frequencies to fellow Emmis Austin Radio outlet KGSR, commanding the airwaves each weeknight from 6 to 10pm, followed by the usual specialty shows until midnight. "KGSR is very much the heartbeat of radio in this town," says Langer, who promises new tunes, vault selections, and "at least a few songs an hour that you wouldn't normally hear." Don't touch that dial.

Tejano music legend Lydia Mendoza, best known for her 1934 hit, "Mal Hombre," died Dec. 20, in San Antonio, where she began her career in 1928 with La Familia Mendoza. Heralded as the Alondra de la Frontera (Lark of the Border) for her distinct 12-string acoustic guitar and vocal styles that bridged traditional Spanish musical styles, Mendoza, 91, recorded more than 50 albums for labels as diverse as RCA and El Zarape, paving the way for future generations of Mexican-American musicians. She was awarded the National Medal of Arts in 1999.

What do Arcade Fire, Devendra Banhart, Chamillionaire, Steve Earle, Feist, the Frames, Fiery Furnaces, Gogol Bordello, Interpol, Kings of Leon, Bettye LaVette, LCD Soundsystem, Manu Chao, Spoon, Bruce Springsteen & the E Street Band, Tinariwen, UGK, Mary Weiss, Wilco, Lucinda Williams, and the Wu-Tang Clan have in common? In 2007, albumwise ... well, they put on great live shows.

Many of them here in Austin even.

In related news, on Dec. 10 in Stockholm, France's Albert Fert and Deutschland's Peter Grünberg won the Nobel Prize in Physics for their independent manipulation of electromagnetic fields allowing for storage of astronomical amounts of data onto minuscule hard drives. That's right, the iPod won the Oscar of the science universe. At the ceremony, accepting honors from His Majesty King Carl XVI Gustaf of Sweden, it wore white. ...

Back on planet rock, Radiohead's beatific work of science fiction, In Rainbows - one of the year's best albums - never even bothered with a physical storage vessel, a free download, if you like, from cyberspace. Its Austin equivalent, meanwhile - Top 10 best - Okkervil River's The Stage Names put on a show of epic proportions without ever really acknowledging that the deluxe version of the album came packaged with a bonus disc of demos in some cases more compelling than the main attraction. Red River kids White Denim, on the other leg, stitched their triangular exuberance into local-music-scene nepotism not on outdated aluminum bit but rather on dazzling, 7-inch red-and-white vinyl. Let's Talk About It when you get your turntable fixed.

If the medium truly remains the message, "albums" will one day again be played at 33 revolutions per minute on 12-inch petroleum product, while you lie on your floor reveling in the LP art and reading liner notes/production credits without trifocals.

2007 was the year that was. It came in as a lamb and went out as a tired, old goat. It's hard to complain about a year that didn't have a

For day-trippers, good news came from the 80th Texas Legislature. Texas state and local parks finally received a boost in funding. After years of neglect and a \$125 million backlog in repairs, the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department received a \$5 million boost to their \$20.6 million budget. Besides money for operating the park, the Lege budgeted \$25 million for repairs to the battleship Texas and \$27 million for major infrastructure repairs at state parks.

Kudos to state Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, for finally ushering the spending through the House. The bill also includes \$36.3 million for local park grants and \$52 million in bonding authority.

But the Lege gives and the Lege takes away. The bill transfers 18 state historic sites from TPWD to the Texas Historical Commission. The list includes the Landmark Inn in Castroville, the National Museum of the Pacific War in Fredericksburg, Casa Navarro in San Antonio, and the Starr Family Home in Marshall.

And then Texas House Speaker Tom Craddick showed again that he can't play nice with other members by blocking the \$2 million to save the Texas State Railroad. The beleaguered historical railroad between Rusk and Palestine has been on the verge of closure for the last few years. Rep. Byron Cook, R-Corsicana, got lawmakers to approve a Texas State Railroad Authority, but Craddick refused to let the money be spent. We'll have to wait and see if the trains will actually run in time to see the dog-

At Lake Tawakoni State Park, 50 miles east of Dallas, it was the spiders that were making news. Scientists believe that thousands of spiders from different species worked together to make a web that stretched nearly 200 yards. Twelve kinds of spiders worked on the communal web that caught countless bugs and national attention.

Just when you thought is was safe to go back into the water, a Nacogdoches man was in critical but stable condition after being infected with flesh-eating bacteria during a swim, July 8 at Crystal Beach in Galveston County. The 58-year-old man was diagnosed with necrotizing fasciitis, a tissue-destroying disease caused by the Vibrio bacterium. Doctors said healthy swimmers probably had nothing to fear but those with open wounds or chronic illnesses shouldn't wade into the Gulf of Mexico during the summer months.



In Lubbock, the divide between the city and Buddy Holly's estate got a little wider this year. The City Council rescinded a 1995 resolution creating the Buddy Holly Walk of Fame and Buddy Holly Terrace, after Maria Elena Holly asked for \$10,000 in annual licensing fees. The locations will now be known as the West Texas Walk of Fame and the West Texas Terrace.

Previously, the city changed the name of the Buddy Holly Music Festival after Ms. Holly increased the fee for the event held around the musician's Sept. 7 birthday. The concert is now known as the Lubbock Music Festival. Ms. Holly still gets a percentage of the Buddy Holly Museum's gift-shop sales.

This past year, everyone from farmers to swimmers was happy with one of the wettest springs in recent memory. West Texas and the Panhandle enjoyed a March with more than 4 inches of moisture in an area that normally gets less than 2 inches.

But the long-term outlook isn't that rosy. Researchers at Columbia University said that Texas and the Southwest will see a trend of drier and hotter weather over the next two decades. Computer models conclude that the region will face serious drought conditions as early as 2021. While the droughts of the Dust Bowl and the 1950s were driven by natural temperature variations, the forecasted water shortage is the result of higher global temperatures.

And finally, what is hosting a Super Bowl worth? The Dallas City Council's bid for Super Bowl XLV in 2011 included an exemption from all local taxes. At the same time Dallas law enforcement, fire, and medical services will provide free game-related services.

of sports stories and events to remind us of



why we love these childish games so much. The numbers on the scoreboard are meaningful, but the tales and people surrounding them are often of greater importance and have a remarkable impact upon our lives. What follows is a list of 10 notable sports happenings of the last year that may have caught the attention of Austin-area sports lovers. Enjoy, and good luck in '08.

lacktriangle In January the Austin Toros mascot, lacktriangle lacktriangle Bull, had his 15 minutes of fame, appearing on ESPN's Cold Pizza after being suspended for two games and assessed 50 hours of community service for running onto the court with 0.4 seconds remaining in a game against Colorado and hanging from the rim, colliding with a 14ers player in the process. The Toros also inked a deal with the San Antonio Spurs later in the year, becoming their sole minor-league affiliate.

Director Bob Ray and producer Werner Campbell debuted their featurelength Roller Derby documentary, Hell on Wheels, at the Paramount Theatre during South by Southwest Film 07 in March, bringing the two local feuding leagues (Texas Rollergirls, Lonestar Rollergirls) together to share in their accomplishments and success. Austin is truly the birthplace of a new era for Roller Derby.

3) University of Texas women's basketball coach Jody Conradt retired in March after 31 years with the program, 900 wins, and a national championship in 1986. Duke's Gail Goestenkors scored Conradt's old gig.

4) Kevin Durant made it official in April, by declaring for the NBA's '07 draft. He goes on to be picked No. 2 overall by the Seattle Supersonics.

5) On June 28, Craig Biggio became the 27th big-league ballplayer to reach the 3,000-hit plateau. He was the ninth to do it all with one team (the Houston Astros). Biggio ended his career with 3,060 hits, good for 20th all-time. Thanks for the memories. Bidge.

The critically acclaimed and locally shot TV series Friday Night Lights debuted its second season on Friday, Oct. 5. If you have not given this show a chance, run out and pick up season one on DVD and enjoy one of the finest sports dramas ever.

On Oct. 12 the **Austin Wranglers** announced that they were moving from the Arena Football League proper to the minor-league ArenaFootball2.



ONE MISSED CALL

REDACTED

In the opening and closing credits of this film, De Palma provides a visual explanation of the meaning of the word "redacted" by blacking out or otherwise editing words and/or images on the screen. During the opening credits, the choice to edit the material was his; in the moving closing credits (which is a series of photos of Iraqi war dead) the choice was not the director's but his distribution company's in an attempt to protect the anonymity of the victims. The issue of the director's work ironically becoming a subject for redaction pales in contrast to the passion De Palma brings to this movie. The fate of Redacted is small potatoes compared with what De Palma regards as the U.S. government's wholesale obscuring of the truth about the war in Iraq. His film is as stylistically raw as his emotions. The story is a fictional account of the events in Samarra before, during, and after the actual rape and mur-



der of a 15-year-old girl and her family by American soldiers. De Palma uses documentary techniques in order to tell his fictionalized tale. In many aspects, Redacted echoes De Palma's 1989 Vietnam War film, Casualties of War, in which Michael J. Fox plays a soldier whose conscience won't permit him to go along with his unit's coverup of a rape and accompanying atrocity. In the new film, De Palma uses various camera truths to piece together the narrative. The bulk of the film is seen through the lens of the camera wielded by Angel Salazar (Diaz), a grunt who hopes to use the film he makes of his buddies in Iraq as his entrance portfolio into film school. The cutaways from Salazar's video are to images caught through a variety of means: the base's security cameras, a website created by jihadists and another by a military wife, a film being made by French journalists that just happens to focus on Salazar's unit, footage from embedded journalists, and even the video of Salazar's psych evaluation. The impression De Palma leaves is that the more images we have to look at, the less we see and comprehend. Yet De Palma too falls victim to the shorthand of images. The use of stereotypes is prevalent throughout Redacted, whether it is the racism and primitivism of the American soldiers, the arty pretensions of the French, or ultimately, the perfidy of the American government. Also, the dramatic skills of the movie's group of unknown actors are not well enough honed to express narrative nuances. Despite its shortcomings, Redacted is nevertheless a film brimming with spontaneity and fury, and in a season of often-ambiguous films about the war in Iraq, there is a lot to be said for this kind of combustible energy. ALIENS VS. PREDATOR: REQUIEM

This sequel to the much-maligned (though, to be fair, probably just misunderstood) Aliens vs. Predator is an orgy of mindless violence, a random collection of bloody bodies, alien misanthropy, and slobbering carnage designed to bore straight into the pleasure centers of 13-year-old boys and leave the rest of us wondering when the movies got so damn loud. I won't go too deeply into the film's plot because I don't want to ruin it for you, but I can tell you that a UFO carrying a pack of salivating aliens like those that tormented Sigourney Weaver back in the Eighties crash-lands in the woods outside a small town in Colorado, followed by the arrival of a predator (of the dreadlocked variety that tormented Jesse "the Body" Ventura back in the Eighties), who's hunting down the aliens one by one. What's it all about, Alvin? Apparently it's about rebranding a musty old comic conceit for a whole new generation of proto-Willards. The adenoidal animated vermin of Ross Bagdasarian Sr. and Ir, have arrived via CGI in this live-action update ing/companion to the Bagdasarian family's lengthy rodentia comicus-related history, the pinnacle of which remains 1958's holiday novelty tune "The Chipmunk Song (Christmas Don't Be Late)." Hill's Chipmunk tale is a strictly by-the-numbers affair, aimed in the most generic direction conceivable. Lee plays Dave, a well-intentioned but bumbling songwriter aided and abetted in life and love (and icky-sweet pop music) by My Three Chipmunks. Mr. Show's Cross is a duplicitous record mogul, who plays nice with Dave while conniving behind his back (boo!), and Richardson is the mutant-modelphotographer-chick-thing Dave's all gooey on. ATONEMENT

Imagination typically should be encouraged in children, but an excess of it leads to tragedy in this more than worthy adaptation of lan McEwan's novel. Thirteen-vear-old Briony (the wonderfully unnerving novice Ronan) is indulged, but also largely ignored, by her family, which includes her headstrong 19-year-old sister, Cecilia (Knightley, seductively husky, wincingly angular). One day in 1935, Briony witnesses a bewildering act that involves Cecilia and the housekeeper's son, Robbie (McAvoy). Only later does she realize how one person's vantage, one person's truth, doesn't always square with another's. But that epiphany doesn't arrive until the film's second of three sections, when a now-18-year-old Briony (Garai) attempts to write a novelization of that day in 1935. (The film's epilogue takes place in modern times.) Atonement is a work consumed with the nature of storytelling and the moral responsibility of the storyteller. The film is not quite as brutalizing as McEwan's brilliant source novel, but it ravishes nonetheless in its grand exploration of the sins of the daughter and a lifetime spent making reparations. BEE MOVIE

Bee Movie is an agreeable though tame animated picture. Seinfeld plays Barry B. Benson, a bee who, having just graduated from college (with "perfect grades – all Bs"), must choose a career. Visually, Bee Movie never fully capitalizes on the reality-bending possibilities of the animated form. The story zips along at a fast clip so that the film's nifty and not-so-nifty moments are swept along in its current, including some pertinent though gentle messages about the ecological balance of the universe. Bee Movie works best when it sticks to the insect world: when Barry leaves the hive with the Pollen Jocks and breaks the cardinal rule of beedom by speaking to humans, the film becomes more earthbound and prosaic. BEFORE THE DEVIL KNOWS YOU'RE DEAD

Lumet is 83 years old now, but the storyline in Before the Devil Knows You're Dead carries both the rhythms of youthful vanity – and its attendant fear-lessness – and the dead-on, relentless morality of an Old Testament Hollywood hand. This is one of those films where the less you know going in, the better time you'll likely have, but the bare bones go like this: Two brothers, Hank (Hawke) and Andy (Hoffman) Hanson, plot the robbery of a jewelry story to alleviate their individual financial woes. This misguided robbery goes horrifically wrong and sets off a chain reaction of cascading disasters for not only the brothers Hanson but, ultimately, for the entire Hanson family. The situation doesn't just bomb; it goes all-out nuclear. Meanwhile the performances of the two leads, as well as Finney, Tomei, and the others, are downright thrilling. (11/09/2007)- Marc Saylov

The irony inherent in using 21st century motioncontrol technology to tell a tale approximately 1,400 years old is just one of many bizarrely entertaining aspects of Beowulf. High school English teachers may breathe a collective sigh of relief:

Although this version of Beowulf (the script, ricocheting between thrilling, heroic, and hilarious, is by Neil Gaiman and Roger Avary) does take some liberties, it's as faithful to the extant version as it needs to be. There's no doubt Beowulf is crackerjack popcorn entertainment. The 3-D effects are jaw-droppingly immersive and realistic, but thanks to the witty, zippy script, they never detract from the story. The sticking point, for many people, will be Zemeckis' reliance on the imperfect technique of motion-control animation, which still exhibits a certain Shrekiness when it comes to such complex, expressive textures as the human face. CHARLIE WILSON'S WAR

Accents by way of Hee Haw aside, not once in this would-be political romp do we forget that the man and woman before us, embodying such outré real-life characters as a hard-partying congressman and a born-again Houston socialite, are anyone other than the beloved institutions of Tom and Julia. Based on George Crile's book, Charlie Wilson's War tells the true-life story of how Texan Rep. Wilson (Hanks), best known for boozing and keeping company with Playboy Playmates, managed to raise \$1 billion with the help of socialite Joanne Herring (Roberts) to secretly fund Afghanistan's mujahideen in their fight against the invading Soviet Union in the early Eighties. Sounds a little wonky, I know, but, as adapted by The West Wing's Aaron Sorkin, the historical context and current affairs are laid out clearly and engagingly. That said, there's a hokeyness afoot. Same goes with Nichols' flat direction. This is a visually and emotionally soft affair, and the material calls for something with far sharper edges. - Kimberley Jones

DAN IN REAL LIFE

If this is "real life," then count me out. His previous effort, Pieces of April, followed a similar trajectory of family entanglement, though the characters had more edge and personality than they do in Dan in Real Life. Hedges also wrote the screenplays for What's Eating Gilbert Grape?

and About a Boy, other works whose distinctive characters stand apart from mediocrity. This new film will garner Hedges his biggest audience, and let's hope that it allows him to return to his more quirkily crafted characterizations. THE DARJEELING LIMITED

With his fifth feature film, Anderson boards another train of ironic whimsy, although this time the train is quite literal. An aura of preciousness remains as the filmmaker again pairs his stylized images and storytelling with characters and a plot that resist neat categorizations, twin narrative events with telling pieces of music, and searches for emotional connections among ironically detached characters. Brothers Francis (Wilson), Peter (Brody), and Jack (Schwartzman) Whitman, who have been apart since their father's death a year ago, embark on a train ride through India as something of a reunion tour and spiritual journey. Somewhere near the end of the journey is their aloof mother (Huston), a nun in a Himalayan outpost. Like the Whitman Sampler they are, each brother is marked by a unique bundle of quirky traits. The film begins in an all-too-familiar animated wonderland. 

All this happens during the film's first 10 minutes, so initially I was optimistic. First of all, Lawrence's desolate Manhattan is a wonder to behold. And secondly, Smith's Neville is no unblinking model of action film courage; he is terrified, lonely, and racked with guilt over his inability to save the lives of ... well, anyone – a guilt he tries to assuage by working on a vaccine to save humanity, not to mention his own soul. And though Penn has conjured up a beautifully acted, visually bracing film that captures all the romantic energy and freedom of a life spent outside the bounds of society, some where along the way he misplaced that melancholy that made McCandless' story so devastating. 

NO COUNTRY FOR OLD MEN

It seems at first like an odd pairing: the Coen brothers, they of the dark-humored film genre conflations, and Cormac McCarthy, the modern laureate of the Southern gothic novel. Yet the Coens' adaptation of McCarthy's as-if-written-for-the-screen No Country for Old Men becomes a marvelous meld of sensibilities. The film is essentially a crime drama, although also something of a chase film. It holds up against the Coens' earlier genre masterpieces like Miller's Crossing and Fargo and makes recent genre misfires like Intolerable Cruelty and The Ladykillers more forgivable. The No Country for Old Men storyline is as old as the template for the brothers' first film, Blood Simple: Follow the money. At least three characters are chasing a satchel filled with \$2 million. One of them is Anton Chigurh (Bardem), a character who immediately leaps into the forefront of indelible American monsters. As it unfolds, the cat-and-mouse chase is a sheer delight to watch. It'll make it sound like something for nonmasochists to sidestep, and nothing could be further from the truth of this smart, funny, thoughtful, and exquisitely realized film. Jenkins' movie is a deft blend of realism and playful touches of structural whimsy and Brechtian distancing. Jon (Hoffman) and Wendy (Linney) are the grown and distant children of Lenny Savage (Bosco), who is showing the first signs of senile dementia. The subtlety of the interplay between siblings is one of the joys of *The Savages*. The film is likely to play differently to people of different age groups, maybe even sexes. To what extent one identifies with, recognizes, and fears each of the characters may govern the viewer's disposition toward the subject matter. More than most, the Saw films have held fast to an internal logic that only gets more complex - yet never entirely lapses into outright inanity - with each successive episodic outrage. Saw IV finally offers Jigsaw's horrific backstory in flashback, an unnecessary denuding that absolves no one, least of all this fleshless engineer and his hellbound heart. Burton's gorgeously grim film (his sixth with Depp) is loyal to Sondheim's original, both in spirit and structure; it's dark and gothic and drenched in blood, and it forgoes excessive dialogue in the name of getting quickly to the next murky, malevolent, yet strangely forgettable tune. Poor Depp, though, isn't up to the challenge of a musical. So by the time he gets that long-wished-for shot at restitution, I didn't care anymore if he succeeded or not so long as he stopped singing about it. 

Take one abusive relationship, add some infidelity, a dead child, a mountain of guilt, several fur coats, a cat fight or two, and you've got yourself one hell of a melodramatic throwdown. The story follows a rise-fall-and-riseagain structure as Dewey meets the love of his life (Fischer), develops multiple drug addictions, loses his love, finds her again, and along the way falls prey to every generational music trend in the book. Whether traveling to India with the Beatles, writing protest songs, or hosting a variety show, Dewey manages to enact all the rock & roll clichés. Simultaneously dumb and enjoyable, the silliness manages at times to be both wonderful and cringe-worthy. In the end, Reilly's oblivious swagger successfully carries much of the film. (12/21/2007)

CHALLENGING A BILLING ERROR ON A CREDIT CARD BILL

I just got this month's credit card bill. I was charged for two holiday gifts I bought and then returned the next day. What is the easiest way for me to have my credit card company take care of the problem?

Your credit card company has made a "billing error." Many billing errors can be resolved if you have a basic understanding of the Fair Credit Billing Act, a federal law passed by Congress in 1975 to help consumers settle disputes with their credit card companies. Under the FCBA, a consumer may challenge credit card charges for numerous reasons, including charges for goods or services that were not accepted or that were not delivered as agreed (i.e., a defective product) and charges made by unauthorized persons.

There are, however, specific things you must do to challenge the billing error. You must send the credit card company a letter, preferably via certified mail, stating that there has been a billing error, and the letter must be sent within 60 days of the first bill you received that gave you notice of the billing error. The letter should include your name and account number, a statement that you think your bill contains an error and the actual dollar amount of that error, and the reasons why you believe the bill is incorrect. Try to include photocopies of all receipts and any documents that were relevant to the transaction.

The credit card company is required to acknowledge receipt of your letter within 30 days after receiving it and has a maximum of 90 days to investigate the claim. If there is an error on your bill, the credit card company should write to you explaining the corrections that have been made to your account. Alternatively, if the credit card company still believes there is no mistake, you will be notified with the reasons why it believes the bill is correct. Keep in mind that while you are allowed to withhold payment on the disputed item during this process, you are required to make regular payments on the rest of the items listed on your credit card bill. The good news is that your credit card company cannot threaten to damage your credit ratings while the dispute over the billing error is ongoing.




