Revisiting the smoking ban and the return of Otto Binder

In the Chronicle's online forum discussions, the smoking ban issue is once again hot, with champions for each side already in combat. I editorialized against the ban when it was on the ballot and continue to think it is a bad law. Most of us bristle at the notion that, under pressure from specific religious or special interest groups, the government does and will continue to legislate morality. Obviously, semantics and definitions are crucial to this discussion. Many of those in the anti-government crowd are still against abortions, which they would like the government to make illegal. The problem occurs when personal beliefs and moral standards are attached to something greater. The legislation then is rationalized as being for the greater good rather than born out of proponents' personal beliefs. With abortions, it is the murder of unborn children; with the smoking ban, it's health.

Obviously, I do have a horse in this race, but there are still things worth noting. In many letters and postings, those supporting the ban glossed over any concerns about the consequences to the financial health of the clubs. They assured all of us that live music clubs would not only survive but would do better than ever, as the smokers would remain as customers and crowds of nonsmokers would now visit these smoke-free environments. The economic effects of the ban have not been as devastating as feared, but the nonsmokers who were supposed to turn out in record numbers have yet to show.

As a rear-guard action, the most self-righteous and contemptuous arguments offered have been those along the lines of, "Well, if the clubs aren't doing well, it shows that the smokers weren't really committed to live music." Sorry, but that's just pathetic.

Before the final version of the ban was even voted on, much less passed, smoking was already not allowed in the vast majority of Austin public businesses. There were only about 200 businesses left in town that had decided to allow smoking to continue. Given that these clubs are not now nearly as crowded as predicted, it's obvious that the reason those supporting the ban were staying away was not because they couldn't stand the smoke. They weren't

worried about secondhand smoke themselves; they hadn't been and weren't going to start attending music clubs. It was just that, puritanically, they wanted to stop others from smoking.

What becomes absolutely clear is that an option was taken away from business owners and customers. The lack of audience surge means that many of the people who voted for the ban, though they cited health as a motivating force, were actually far more interested in imposing their personal views on the rest of us.

I don't smoke and am not a fan of smoking. Regardless, I am a fan of citizens' rights, and I especially dislike it when people try to impose their own morality on others by claiming that the issue isn't about beliefs at all - that, rather, it's about the logic of tailoring the law to some objective standard, be it science, health, safety, or the sanctity of life. Both the left and the right, liberals and conservatives, participate in this gambit. Any distinctions here are, of course, inherently controversial, and by no means are any of the issues that clear-cut. The line between the biologically determined and the ideologically conceived can be awfully hard to discern. But what I do know is that when smoking was already banned in all but 200 or so businesses out of thousands, crusading to ban smoking everywhere had little to do with personal health.

The last few columns took a break from the series about Otto Binder. Using the pseudonym Eando Binder, the prolific and wellknown SF pulp writer had by 1940 also begun writing comic books, which paid significantly more. Soon, most of his work was comic books, and, increasingly, more of that was for Fawcett Publications, where he became part of the creative team behind Captain Marvel and family. He loved working at Fawcett, which proved one of the most creative and happiest times of his life. Unfortunately, it wasn't to last.

When Captain Marvel first appeared, National Periodical Publications (later D.C.), the publishers of Superman, sued Fawcett, claiming that the Big Red Cheese (Captain Marvel's nickname) was a complete imitation of the Man of Steel, infringing on their copyright. Evidently, there were three major suits involved; Fawcett won the first and third suits, National the second one. When National then made additional charges of plagiarism, Fawcett simply settled. There was a monetary payment involved, and they had to stop publishing Captain Marvel-related books. Already facing dramatically falling comic book sales, they decided to just fold the whole comic book line in the mid-1950s.

This was a devastating development for many, especially editor Wendell Crowley (remember that name - he becomes a central character later). Binder had worked steadily at Fawcett for 13 years, but his employment was always as a freelancer, which meant no benefits and no retirement. During the whole time he worked for Fawcett, he had continued to work for other companies, but now he needed another major writing relationship.

In the early 1930s, Otto and his brother Earl had become fast friends with fellow science-fiction fans Julius Schwartz and Mort Weisinger, who by this time had both become major

> editors at National Periodicals. Schwartz handled the science-fiction titles, while Weisinger had the more important job of editing Superman and its related titles. Binder began writing for both of them.

Unfortunately, he did so well that he soon graduated to writing mostly for the Superman books, which meant working only with Weisinger. In creative terms, this proved extraordinarily productive, as one of their main tasks was to revitalize Superman. They initiated the Imaginary Stories (what Superman's

life would have been if Krypton hadn't exploded), Bizarro, Bizarro World, and the villain Brainiac and introduced Superman's cousin, Supergirl. Two of the main Superman characters were given their own books: Superman's Pal, Jimmy Olsen (Binder wrote most of the first 30 issues) and Superman's Girlfriend, Lois Lane.

The problem was that Weisinger, by all accounts, was an extraordinarily egocentric, mean son of a bitch. Constantly abusive toward those working for him, he made doing their jobs an ordeal. Despite their long friendship, he routinely belittled Binder's work.


Anxious to develop other sources of income besides comics, Binder jumped at the chance when he was asked to be the editor of a new serious magazine, Space World. The idea was that the publication would do well because of the public fascination with space in the wake of Sputnik. They also asked him to invest in the magazine, which required taking out a mortgage on his fully paid-off house. Space World never took off, and when Binder finally bailed on it in 1963, he was completely broke.

He returned to writing comic books and science fiction while also repackaging some of his older stories to publish as novels in paperback. The best thing that happened to him during this period was the emergence of comic book fandom - which is why and how I met him.

Having discovered that Otto Binder lived in the town next to where I lived in New Jersey, I arranged to visit him in 1964. Soon after the first visit, I was a regular visitor to his home, which he always referred to as "the house that Captain Marvel built."

Otto and Ione, his wife, had a daughter, Mary, who was born in 1952, when Otto was already 40 years old. Mary was extremely pretty and remarkably nice. She never did anything with Otto and me, never attended a comic con, went into the



city, or just talked. Named after Mary Marvel, she was the center of her parents' universe. Being as dorky as a young teen could possibly be, I was very shy around her. She was always sweet, going out of her way to talk to me. It was a little odd: I remember the house as dark, Otto working all the time, Ione in the background, but Mary was a ray of light. Smiling, always with friends over or waiting to go out, she seemed to live in almost a different world from the one her parents lived in.

More often than not, when I arrived at the house (mostly on Saturdays but sometimes on Sundays), Otto would be working. I would hang out all afternoon reading Golden Age comics, pulp magazines, and old fanzines until he finished working. Then we'd talk, often for hours. Whatever I'd just read would be the starting point; he filled in the background and detailed context, creating a sense of the life he had been leading at the time. Stories would range from tales of the great SF fan wars of the Thirties to anecdotes about writers to memories of what it was like at his brother Jack's shop or working at Fawcett.

There are at least two more parts to this series, though one will probably end up online only. The ending of this story goes from bad to worse, from the truly tragic to the even more painfully so.

(Although my writing on Otto Binder is largely autobiographical, as well as supplemented by notes I took at the time and letters from Otto, crucial to it and to any writing on Binder is Bill Schelly's magnificent biography Worlds of Wonder.)



SWEET READ FOR A CHILLY WINTER



- Council returns today (Thursday, Jan. 14) for its first regularly scheduled meeting of the year. Procedural business includes the approval of a slew of new contracts and appointment of new municipal court judges; additionally, the future of UT's controversial Brackenridge Tract and Austin Energy's 2020 generation plan are up for discussion albeit in executive session.
- Mayor **Lee Leffingwell** called on residents to kick in some cash for earthquake relief efforts in the tiny island nation of **Haiti**, where the capital city Port-au-Prince was practically leveled by a quake Tuesday. "In August 2005, we witnessed an unprecedented outpouring of support in Austin for those impacted by Hurricane Katrina," Leffingwell said. "Today, I'm calling on all Austinites to rally in support of the people and families devastated by yesterday's earthquake." - Two Austin Police Department officers could be facing substance-abuse-related charges after separate arrests in Williamson County on Jan 12. Officer **Leonardo Quintana**, who fatally shot Nathaniel Sanders II in 2009, was arrested for drunken driving in Leander, while Sgt. **Craig Martin** was arrested in Cedar Park for huffing glue (details on p.13).
- The Big Chill: Single-digit temperatures hit parts of Central Texas over the weekend. While Austin was spared the worst of the weather, there were some road closures as Austin Water Utility workers scrambled to fix broken pipes.

The Army Saves the Day

The Corps of Engineers speaks, and Travis County and TXI hang fire

The cavalry arrived just in time.

With the sound of a trumpet riding over the hill - more precisely, a series of last-minute e-mails and phone messages - the beleaguered Travis County commissioners were saved from having to make a final decision in the battle between Texas Industries Inc. and the residents of eastern Travis County (just this side of Webberville). It's not at all clear whether noint the rescue will stick or if the county and residents have just bought a little more time to try to fend off TXI's plans for a major aggregate mining operation. But it was an undeniably dramatic Tuesday meeting at Commissioners Court, with the punctuation provided by Travis County Judge Sam Biscoe. "I came in here this morning," said the judge, "thinking we would be ready to make a decision. Now this e-mail does muddle things for us."

Even more surprisingly, the uniformed cavalry in this instance is none other than the Army Corps of Engineers (Fort Worth District), in the person of Permits Section Chief Jennifer Walker, who informed an inquiring resident and then the county that the Corps will certainly want to take a look at this project and may require a full permitting review before


the work may proceed. The details are all very much up in the air – taken by surprise that morning, TXI continues to insist that no such review or permit is required – and both the county and the company will be consulting with the Corps to find out what happens next.

Barely noticed in the uproar was that it took an inquiry from an Austin's Colony resident, Ryan Metz, to alert the Corps that it might have jurisdiction over the project, under the Clean Water Act. County staff had accepted at face value TXI's assertion that no federal review is required. "We require the applicants to make that coordination," county engineer Teresa Calkins told me later.

In light of the new information, Biscoe asked Calkins for her response. Calkins said that based on her conversation with Walker, she thought the court should delay action until the Corps determines whether it indeed has jurisdiction – the court unanimously concurred. Asked after the meeting if he had any reaction to the news from Fort Worth and the decision by the court, TXI attorney Henry Gilmore said only, "We're still plugging."














10 to 30 years.

Coming into Tuesday's meeting, it seemed likely that the project would be allowed to go forward. Last week Biscoe told me that the court's attorneys had informed the commissioners that the county could not legally block the project, and a negative vote would almost certainly result in a quickly successful TXI lawsuit. State law specifically prohibits counties from regulating land use, and repeated efforts by counties to acquire that authority have been rejected by the Legislature - yet another attempt, prominently championed by Precinct 3 Commissioner Karen Huber, was scuttled last year. Biscoe indicated that he didn't see that the commissioners had much choice and was frankly surprised that the court didn't vote to approve a development permit in its Dec. 22

returning the mined land to agricultural con-

ditions. Depending on the construction mar-

ket for aggregate, the mining could last from

meeting - deciding instead to attempt mediation and in the meantime design a county monitoring program for health and safety issues.

Biscoe's a blunt and pragmatic man, and when asked if he believes - as distinct from the legal issues - whether the TXI project, if allowed to go forward, is indeed likely to cause ongoing health and safety problems for the area in the future, he didn't hesitate to answer: "Yes." Nonetheless, based on the previous discussion and preliminary votes, it seemed likely that the court would vote 3-2 to approve. Adamantly opposed is Ron Davis, whose Precinct 1 includes the site. But the only other commissioner who had expressed a willingness to join Davis was Huber, although she acknowledged reluctantly that it seems the law is with TXI. "I don't oppose all mining

projects," Huber told me, "but there is nothing good about this mining operation in this location. I feel when our laws fail us, we have to make a stand."

Biscoe and Commissioner Margaret Gómez appeared to concur with Commissioner Sarah Eckhardt, who believes it inevitable that the county would lose a lawsuit already threatened by TXI. Eckhardt was attempting to find what she called a "doable middle way" by permitting the project but enforcing firm county monitoring of health and safety conditions including both the mining and related truck traffic. "If we allow no wiggle room on safety," Eckhardt told me, "and spend that money monitoring the situation rather than just losing the court battle, I think that provides the greatest degree of aid to the residents."



A Call to Arms

Tuesday afternoon, Metz told the commissioners he believes that the Corps will require a full federal review and that Walker told him the corps doesn't "piecemeal" projects - it would review everything, including TXI's plans to upgrade the already dangerous FM 969 to accommodate an additional 700 daily truck trips. (The company would prefer a four-mile conveyor belt but shelved that plan to avoid a variance hearing from the city of Austin - the site is in Austin's extraterritorial jurisdiction.) The county requires that all other necessary permits be in place before it approves the project and will now await the results of the meetings between the Corps and TXI. Let's hope the court doesn't rely only on TXI's version of the conversation.

Whatever happens in this particular battle, that area of the county - a few miles beyond SH 130 and Austin's "desired development zone" - is poised to be the scene of many more skirmishes over development, historical farmlands, neighborhoods, and industry. TXI clearly plans to be the aggregator of first choice in that ready-mix future, and the county will be trying to find a reasonable balance between a burgeoning population and the construction industries required to service them. Huber specifically blamed the aggregate industry for killing county land-use authority at the Legislature, and said that if TXI manages to bulldoze the residents' homemade defenses, "the Hornsby Bend project will become the poster child for the next legislative session."

"I'm disappointed that we haven't come together to fight this," concluded Huber. "I just feel it's time to step up."


- EPA GETS TOUGH ON SMOG, TOUGH ON TEX-AS The Environmental Protection Agency has proposed a stronger health standard on smog, drawing praise from environmentalists, scorn from Gov. Rick Perry, and concern from local officials. The current standard is .075 parts per million, and the Austin area barely managed to make that standard this past summer. The new proposal calls for a level of .06 to .07. Nonattainment can bring restrictions on the availability of federal transportation funding. The Sierra Club praised the proposal, saying it will lead to less asthma and other respiratory illnesses and heart disease in Texas. Our governor took a dimmer view: "The EPA's only consistent target has been the target on the backs of Texas workers and taxpayers," he said in a press release. "[T]he Obama administration seems intent upon following flawed science down a road that will lead to the loss of hundreds of thousands of Texas jobs, while doing nothing more to protect human health." The EPA will issue the final standard Aug. 31; it is currently taking public input, including at a Feb. 2 hearing in Houston. The Clean Air Force of Central Texas' Technical Advisory Committee will discuss the proposal at its Jan. 28 meeting, 9:30-11:30am, at the Austin Chamber of Commerce. - Lee Nichols
- > QUINTANA ARRESTED Austin Police Officer Leonardo Quintana, who was cleared of any criminal wrongdoing in the May 2009 shooting death of 18-year-old Nathaniel Sanders II, was arrested early Jan. 12 by police in Leander, reportedly after he was in a car accident. He was released that afternoon on bond. Sanders' family attorney Adam Loewy said he deposed Ouintana for six hours on Monday as part of the family's civil suit against the officer, and Quintana seemed "very nervous" and "rattled" by a number of the questions. Austin Police Association President Wayne Vincent said he could not speculate about what happened, but "I will say that he's been under a tremendous amount of stress and pressure" with multiple investigations and reviews of the Sanders shooting death. "We don't have all the details yet, but we're supporting him just like we would any family member." APD says Quintana will remain on restricted duty while the criminal case in Williamson County and an APD Internal Affairs investigation are pending. - Jordan Smith
- be CAUGHT HUFFING Austin Police Sgt. Craig Martin is on restricted duty this week, pending the outcome of two cases in which he was arrested for allegedly using inhalants. Martin was popped in a Lowe's parking lot Dec. 16, 2009, after someone reported to the Kyle police that he was inhaling something from an aerosol can; he was arrested again Jan. 12, this time by Cedar Park Police, who reportedly charged the police supervisor with the illegal use of glue or paint. Martin has been on restricted duty since the December arrest, police say, and will remain off the job pending the outcome not only of the criminal cases but also of APD's internal inquiry.

TRAVIS COUNTY DELEGATION TO THE **RESCUE** With the state of Texas facing falling sales-tax revenues, on Jan. 12 House Speaker Joe Straus announced four new House Select Committees intended to examine spending priorities and find potential savings. The committee charges also glance toward the greatest challenge under the Dome - the state's structural budget deficit, caused by a gap between required expenditures and the current malfunctioning tax base. The Travis County delegation is represented on three of the committees: Rep. Donna Howard, who joins fellow Democrat Elliott Naishtat on the new Federal Legislation committee to study implementation of federal health care reform, said the charges "focus on the most critical issues that we're going to have to address to keep the budget in play and make sure that we have sufficient funds to provide the services that Texans expect." Fellow Travis County Dem Mark Strama joins Emergency Preparedness, while Dawnna Dukes will look for savings on Government Efficiency and Accountability. There are no local reps on Fiscal Stability, which is charged with examining the state's tax base and "whether the shortfall is due to the current recession alone or more systemic problems." While she called it doubtful that any Republican will vote for any tax increases or shifts in an election year, Dukes said, "it will put many on the spot. Depending on the leadership, there will be those that say, 'cut,' but 2003 didn't go well for a Republican majority that made cuts." All four committees must file their reports by Dec. 1. - Richard Whittaker

A PLEA FOR NATIONAL HEALTH CARE EXCHANGE On Jan. 11, Austin's Lloyd Doggett and 10 other members of the Texas

Democratic Congressional delegation wrote to President Obama and the House leadership to urge that the proposed health care legislation, now in negotiation between the House and Senate, include a single, national health care exchange through which citizens can buy insurance, "to protect Texans from second-rate care." The House version of the bill provides for a national exchange, but the Senate version allows individual states to create their own exchanges or even regional exchanges within states. The letter states that the Senate approach "not only reduces the market leverage of the exchange and increases complexity, but it also relies on states with indifferent state leadership that are unwilling or unable to administer and properly regulate a health insurance marketplace." In states like Texas, the members write, where the current leadership opposes the national reforms, the result will be inferior or unproductive. In a statement released with the letter, Doggett wrote: "With 1 in 4 Texans living without insurance, we should not settle for second-rate care. What Would John Galt Do ... About Global Warming? Deny it.

Just before Christmas, in the latest chapter of the ongoing sprouts opera that is John Mackey's relationship with Whole Foods Market Inc., the CEO announced that he is stepping down from the chairmanship of the company's board while staying on as CEO and board member. In a statement posted on his blog Christmas Eve, Mackey described the move as essentially symbolic. "I have held the Chairman title since Whole Foods Market's beginning in 1978, but the reality is that today it is merely a title with no authority or responsibilities. The authority and responsibilities normally associated with the Chairman position were all shifted over time to John Elstrott, after he became our Lead Director back in January 2001. Despite this shift in responsibilities, Whole Foods, along with many other companies with combined CEO/ Chairman roles, has been targeted by corporate governance activists for several years now seeking a separation of these roles."

The loudest of those activists have been associated with the CtW Investment **Group.** which has lobbied the board against Mackey's chairmanship for some time. "CtW" means "Change to Win," and the group works with the pension funds of national unions in the CtW alliance that split from the AFL-CIO in 2005. As an investment group, CtW says it focuses on "organizing workers' capital into an effective voice for corporate accountability and retirement security." (According to financial initiatives manager Per Olstad, CtW funds hold approximately 885,000 shares of WFMI stock, with a market value last week of about \$24.4 million.) Last August, when Mackey's Wall Street Journal op-ed opposing the proposed national health care reform generated widespread publicity and a boycott of Whole Foods, CtW President Bill Patterson said, "Mr. Mackey attempted to capitalize on the brand reputation of Whole Foods to champion his personal political views, but has instead deeply offended a key segment of Whole Foods consumer base."

Asked last week about Mackey's decision to step down from the chairmanship, CtW research director Richard Clayton called the move "long overdue," but said it is unlikely to end CtW's pressure to replace Mackey as CEO. "As long as Mr. Mackey continues to behave this way, and continues to seize opportunities to publicly speak out in ways that seem bound to aggravate Whole Foods customers, and potentially damage the company's reputation, I think we and other shareholders are going to continue calling on the board to address the problem." Mackey's disdain for unions is longstanding and returned in kind, but Clayton rejected speculation that the investors' concerns are simply a political dispute between the CEO and union interests. "It would be a lot more plausible if there were active organizing campaigns [at Whole Foods], which I'm not aware of," Clayton said, "or if the company's performance was more sterling ... due to Mackey's strategic decisions."

Mackey's outspoken opinions aren't confined to health care. A few days after his chairmanship announcement, the Jan. 4 New Yorker published a lengthy Mackey profile by Nick Paumgarten likely to add fuel to the controversy. Amid bemusing reflections about spiritual epiphanies, deep-breathing exercises, and his own rebirthing, Mackey declares his belief that "'no scientific consensus exists' regarding the causes of climate change," dismisses "hysteria about global warming" and international efforts to mitigate its effects, and argues, "Historically, prosperity tends to correlate to warmer temperatures." At a minimum, that would seem to make pointless - or even counterproductive his company's earnestly helpful website enabling customers to calculate their "household carbon footprint." Moreover, the company proudly emphasizes its Green Mission and promotes many programs aimed at environmental action and awareness; Mackey's statements on climate change would seem to have the potential to undermine that work.



In response, Whole Foods spokeswoman Libba Letton said: "I think most of our regular shoppers understand the difference between John Mackey making a personal statement of his opinion about an issue ... versus the corporate policies that govern our organization across almost 300 stores. ... There all sorts of things that we do, day in and day out, that speak to how we care for the environment," reflecting one of the company's "core values." As for shareholder concerns that Mackey's statements might undermine consumer confidence in the Whole Foods brand, Letton said, "I don't sense anything except confidence in Mackey's abilities as CEO of this company and his vision and leadership."

Clayton argues that Mackey's eccentric outspokenness is offending core customers, hurting the Whole Foods brand, and undermining the company's bottom line. "Mackey continues to look for opportunities to publicly tweak Whole Foods' core customer base," he said. "It makes very little sense from a business point of view for the CEO of a company to put his personal beliefs and his partisan commitments ahead of the reputation of his company, and its appeal to consumers.

"The guy's got a **John Galt** complex," Clayton continued, referring to the pouting hero of **Ayn Rand**'s libertarian cult novel *Atlas Shrugged*. "It's unfortunate that he keeps indulging in it, rather than putting his obligations to the company ahead of his personal preferences." Indeed, Mackey told Paumgarten that Rand was mistaken in describing her own philosophy as based on "selfishness" and that he's a better marketer. "And, by telling people that it's all about selfishness, you're alienating a huge potential part of the market unnecessarily," Mackey said. "She really meant selfinterest. Enlightened self-interest. So why use 'selfishness'? It's a bad brand."

On matters of public policy, some shareholders argue, Mackey needs to heed his own advice. – *Michael King*


Clearing the Path to Posthumous Pardon

Attorney General **Greg Abbott** has concluded that a Texas governor may issue a posthumous pardon – even though the subject of the pardon wouldn't be alive to receive the good news. Issued Jan. 7, the opinion came in response to a request penned by Houston Sen. **Rodney Ellis** last summer questioning the governor's power to clear the record of an exonerated individual who has already died. Gov. **Rick Perry's** office had said his hands were tied by a legally binding 1965 A.G. opinion concluding that the law required the exonerated individual to be around to physically receive the pardon. But the previous opinion was not legally binding, Abbott has concluded, and the governor may clean the slate even after a person has passed on.

Now that Abbott has ruled, the field appears clear for Perry to finally pardon **Timothy Cole**, who was convicted of a 1985 rape in Lubbock that he did not commit. Cole died in prison

in 1999 before he was able to clear his name, and last year he became the state's first person to be posthumously exonerated. But even that determination, made by Travis County District Court Judge **Charlie Baird** in February 2009, was not enough to earn Cole a pardon. Now, it seems Cole's family will finally get the relief

they've been looking for. Abbott concluded that there is nothing in the Texas Constitution that would bar a governor from issuing such a pardon so long as the state's Board of Pardons and Paroles recommends the pardon be issued. "The plain language of the constitution does not expressly address whether the Governor may issue posthumous pardons," Abbott wrote. "However, because the constitution has given the Governor pardon power in all criminal cases except treason and impeachment and has not otherwise limited his



clearing Cole's name. The organization took Cole's case after **Jerry Wayne Johnson**, the person actually responsible for the rape of Michelle Mallin, contacted the group to confess his guilt. Blackburn said the group is now working on a pardon packet to be sent to the Board of Pardons and Paroles. In a statement, Perry said he was "pleased" that Abbott had "opened the door" for him to issue such a pardon. "I hope the [board] will act swiftly in sending a recommendation to my desk so that justice can finally be served," he said. – *Jordan Smith*



Driving While Campaigning: Bill White Talking (Around) Climate Action

Is it politically possible to advocate statewide reductions in greenhouse-gas emissions while running for governor of Texas? Houston Mayor **Bill White**, now campaigning for the job as a Democrat, recently answered that question by ... not mentioning greenhouse gases.

"Texas has a great opportunity to be a world leader in energy-efficient fuels," he responded instead. Asked how his leadership on climate action would differ from that of Gov. Rick Perry, he responded, on the "Perry tried to expedite a campaign dozen new coal-fired power plants; I and other mayors stood up against that." (In 2007, Perry signed an executive order to speed construction of 11 new plants; White was co-founder of the Texas mayors' coalition to prevent permitting them.)

White is professionally experienced in national energy and climate-action issues: He served as deputy secretary of energy for the Clinton administration, cofounded the international oil and gas exploration company **Frontera**

Resources, and was a major industry investor through Wedge Group. He said he's read books about global warming, but he clearly prefers not to emphasize it while campaigning. "Global warming aside," he said, there are plenty of other good reasons – air quality, economic opportunity – for Texas to increase its energy efficiency, advocate natural

gas over coal, and develop alternative fuels and vehicles and the state's wind and solar resources.

"In Houston, we've seen that being more energy efficient is good business," he said. He cited his record as Houston mayor, which includes cutting the municipality's energy consumption by 6% through energy efficiency,

despite increased demand for services due to rapid population growth. The city of Houston also purchased 50 megawatts of wind energy, toughened green building standards, expanded bike paths and rail transit, and shifted to hybrid

vehicles and buses. White said he also successfully persuaded the **Environmental Protection Agency** to more aggressively calculate pollution emitted from Houston's large refining and chemical plants. "We can do the same types of things at the state level," he said. "I have long advocated that Texas join most other states in setting higher fuel and efficiency standards."

Perry has persistently denied the sufficiency of scientific evidence that climate change is real and the result of human activity. His stance and similar resistance at the Legislature has resulted in an absence of statewide programs specifically targeted at reducing greenhouse-gas emissions. (That's globally significant; according to figures from the U.S. Energy Information Administration, if Texas were a country, its greenhouse-gas emissions would rank seventh highest in the world.) In contrast to Perry, said White: "I do think there is scientific consensus that human activity does pose a significant risk of more active climate change. There is a risk posed by escalating levels of CO2." He continued, "No one can be precisely

Are They Dreaming? Local Republicans Rattle Awake.

The Travis County Republican Party has fielded one of its largest tickets in recent political history for the March 2 primary. Its strategy is clear: to run against the Obama administration. But the challenge facing the local GOP is how to package its candidates as agents of change in a state where they run the Legislature, the state's highest courts, and the Governor's Mansion. TCRP Chair **Rosemary Edwards** said, "This county has long been blue, but I intend to go precinct by precinct and make it red."

Back in December, the party relocated its headquarters to a suite at a Cameron Road office complex, part of the real estate portfolio of Buttross Properties, owned by former mayoral candidate **David Buttross**, now running against Democratic incumbent **Sarah Eckhardt** for Precinct 2 county commissioner. The new headquarters was the location of a press conference/meet-and-greet with this new round of candidates, and their numbers are initially impressive, though many are first-time candidates and several were late recruits.

The biggest push is in the state Legislature, with Republicans filed in both of the county's Senate seats and four of the six House seats. Republicans are primarily targeting the western portions of Travis, traditionally considered more friendly to conservatives. Former Longhorn offensive lineman **Dan Neil** might be expected to get a boost against Democratic incumbent

Rep. **Donna Howard** from his football achievements (two paragraphs of his website bio cover his career on the field), but Neil argued that his policy positions ("I'm a pro-life, fiscal responsibility, personal responsibility candidate") will resonate with House District 48 voters. He said, "Two sessions ago, this seat was held by conservative Republican **Todd Baxter**, and there are a core group of Republicans that want a conservative Republican candidate to run in that district."

Neil's nomination is uncontested, but other candidates aren't as fortunate. While contested primaries can raise interest in a race, they also cost money and divert resources. In HD 50, hopefuls Ryan Lambert and Patrick McGuinness said they hope Republicans remember the real target is incumbent Dem Mark Strama. Lambert, a firefighter and Ron Paul-style small-"I" libertarian, said: "We're not running against each other. We're running against the failed liberal policies of the incumbents." Both men expect more centralized support than Jerry Mikus received in his 2008 challenge to Strama; he was effectively left to his own devices as the county party concentrated on its failed HD 47 push and only polled 33%. In 2010, McGuinness said, "It's a different Travis County Republican Party, and it's a different level of commitment." As a popular three-term incumbent and Republican-appointed committee chair, Strama will be difficult

to dislodge. But in a year when Democrats have serious intentions for statewide office, a challenge refocuses his energies. Strama said, "From my perspective, it means I'll have to spend more time campaigning in my district than in other districts helping other Democrats."

Amid the talk of gains, local Republicans still have to play defense. Republican Justice of the Peace **Barbara Bembry** is stepping down this year, and documentarian **Glenn Bass** has filed to succeed her in what he called "a critical seat," because "it's not only the only JP seat that we hold; it's the only seat that the Republicans hold that's wholly contained in Travis County."

So how do Travis County Republicans square the circle of opposing the D.C. establishment while bolstering the Austin status quo? Neil argued that with a Republican-dominated Legislature and Republicans holding every statewide office: "If you want to get something done, get a Republican in there. ... He or she will be able to do a better job than an antiestablishment candidate." McGuinness added: "Let's look at it from a bigger picture. The Democrats control everything in Washington, D.C., and are dictating things to the states. We see that a lot of people in this country are not liking those decisions, and we think people are going to make voting decisions at the state level and the local level to change that." — *Richard Whittaker*

Texas Lege: The Shape of Things to Come

Democrats and Republicans both claim they can reshape the Texas Legislature in 2011, but Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, predicts the next session will be a disaster in one key area – the scheduled redistricting of legislative seats. As the sole Republican in the Travis County delegation, Wentworth gained widespread Democratic support last session for Senate Bill 315, his measure to create a nonpartisan Texas Congressional Redistricting Commission. It ultimately failed when Sen. Bob Deuell, R-Greenville, switched his yea vote to a nay, blocking the bill's passage and leaving the old, flawed system in place. Wentworth is already predicting that, whatever the results of the November elections, "by June 1, 2011, we will have adjourned, and the Legislature will not have drawn lines for the Congress, the state Senate, or the state House. We will have failed." He argued that the result will be like the abortive process in 2001 and that "a federal court will draw the lines for Congress, and the Legislative Redistricting Board, made up of five Republicans, will draw the lines for Senate and the House. Whenever you have one party – whether it's the Democrats or the Republicans – totally in control of the lines, it's never fair." – R.W.





"The reality is that by reducing our energy consumed, per square foot of buildings and vehicle mile, we make our state more economically competitive," said White. "We put money in the hands of Texas consumers. We reduce emissions – greenhouse gases and others as well," and reduce smog. "We ought to be promoting renewable fuels here," he said, "and lead on fuelefficient vehicles."

White's thoughts on the agreement in principle reached by the U.S. and other nations at December's United Nations **Climate Change Conference** in Copenhagen? Again, he chose not to discuss solutions to global warming but to advocate other benefits of climate action: "I think it's in our national interest to waste less energy and have cleaner air." He also sidestepped addressing whether, as governor, he would support the U.N. and Obama administration targets for CO2 reductions. He replied

instead, "I would like to play my role to see that the next generation in Texas has affordable electricity and cleaner air."

In the absence of mandatory greenhouse-gas emission targets at the federal level, 29 U.S. states have set goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions; about 20 have established hard targets by state law, or are in the process of doing so. But if that's a future step White might entertain as governor of Texas, we're unlikely to hear about it during the gubernatorial campaign. Instead, he's sticking to messages with tried-and-true political appeal: "I haven't met a single Texan who wants to pay higher utility bills." - Katherine Gregor





Precinct 4 It's good to be the incumbent

Longtime incumbents may suffer the slings and arrows of angry constituents, but they often prove to be formidable fixtures during an election year. Just ask Raul Alvarez, who by now – some six weeks before the March 2 primary - had hoped to have acquired more political traction in his effort to unseat Precinct 4 Travis County Commissioner Margaret Gómez, who has served on the commissioners court since 1995.

Gómez has already picked up endorsements from a number of influential and wellfinanced public safety unions. Alvarez, a former two-term City Council member and current trustee on the Austin Community College board, had been rumored to be a likely winner in the Central Labor Council's candidate

screening process last weekend. But the CLC - the umbrella group of the Austin AFL-CIO took a pass on endorsing in the Precinct 4 race, based in part on recent polling results that raised doubts about Alvarez's ability to topple Gómez in the Democratic primary.

The nonendorsement, however, clears the way for the two dozen or so member affiliates to make their own endorsements, so labor-friendly Alvarez is likely to pick up support from individual unions - possibly including the one that represents Capital Metro employees, who were often at odds with Gómez during her tenure on the transit agency board, where she most recently served as chair. 

Democratic Endorsements: SAD

In the first round of Democratic club endorsements, the South Austin Democrats on Tuesday announced its slate in the judicial and county commissioner races. A candidates forum, which included an unusually wide field of judicial hopefuls, preceded the vote tally. Incumbent Margaret Gómez picked up the club's support in the Precinct 4 commissioners race. The group's judicial picks include Cliff Brown, 147th District Court; Amy Clark Meachum, 201st District Court; Karen Sage, 299th District Court; David Crain, 331st District Court; and John Lipscombe, County Court at Law No. 3.



The weekend's cold snap was a testing time for Austin's water supply. HORSE AND SPARROW ECONOMICS

Time for another Gooberhead Award - presented periodically to those in the news who started their mouths running 100 miles per hour ... but forgot to put their brains in gear.

Today's Goober is a repeat winner – Rudy Giuliani. The former New York City mayor has long been a stalwart defender of the Wall Street crowd that has lavished campaign money on him over the years. So – even though workaday Americans are absolutely outraged and exasperated by the extravagant bonuses that failed Wall Street bankers are paying to themselves, using our bailout money for their self-enrichment - Rudy has stood tall for banker excess. "If somehow you take that bonus out of the economy, it really will create unemployment," he cried.

For the bankers? No, for the little people, says Giuliani. He almost teared up as he explained that the multimillion dollar payouts to high-flying Wall Streeters trickle down to waiters in swank New York restaurants, to clerks at Tiffany & Co. and Gucci, to sales staff at Lamborghini dealers, and to real estate agents selling mansions in the Hamptons. Even gardeners and garbage collectors get their cut, Hizzoner claimed.

He is spouting the age-old theory of "horse and sparrow" economics. This approach says that if you let horses gorge on oats, some of that grain will pass through their systems and be deposited on the ground for the sparrows to enjoy.

Not everyone shares our Gooberhead's enthusiasm for the horse and sparrow theory. Republican Alabama Sen, Richard Shelby, for example, is calling for a strict limit on the pay of bank executives who are getting our bailout money. "The way they have spent it," he said, "is getting close to being criminal." And Sen. Claire McCaskill, D-Missouri, is even more blunt about the rank greed of top bankers. Demanding that no bailout banker should be paid more than the president of the United States, she added: "These people are idiots."

FREEDOM TO PROTEST

The American establishment loves protesters. Foreign protesters, that is - those causing trouble for regimes that our officials don't like.

Here at home, however, the establishment is much less fond of protesters. Curiously, a nation born of democratic rebellion systematically resorts to knee-jerk police repression to crush legitimate public dissent. Not only does this make a mockery of our nation's founding principles, but it usually ends up being quite costly for taxpayers, who later must foot the legal bill for police excesses against our laws and people.

The most recent example stems from a 2002 protest in Washington, D.C., against the corporate autocracy of the International Monetary Fund and World Bank. Hundreds of peaceful protesters and innocent bystanders were attacked by police forces, roughed up, cuffed, and taken away for hours of interrogation about their political and even religious beliefs.

Consequently, lawsuits happened. The city has already paid more than a million dollars in fees and settlements for the police repression. As usual, authorities tried to cover up their actions with lies and more suppression – including mysterious gaps in official audiotapes and the disappearance, destruction, and doctoring of police records.

Last November, the city paid another big settlement to eight protesters who had been illegally detained and grilled by the FBI in a parking garage. For years the FBI and city police flatly denied that this interrogation ever happened. But - oops - as the case was headed to trial, lawyers for the protesters dug out police logs documenting the role of a secret FBI unit in this assault on American liberties.

The price of liberty is, indeed, eternal vigilance, for the Powers That Be are eternally striving to shut down our freedoms. To keep up and act up, visit the American Civil Liberties Union website at www.aclu.org.

The Long Vindication After 35 years and a lengthy sentence for robbery, Ronnie Barrs remains determined to prove his innocence BY JORDAN SMITH

Ronnie Barrs, now 61, carries the papers documenting his case.

For more than 35 years, Ronnie Barrs has insisted that he was not involved in the 1973 robbery of an Austin Minimax grocery store, a crime for which he was convicted the following year. In fact, Barrs doesn't think he ever set foot in the 24-hour Cameron Road grocery, which has long since closed and been replaced by a now-decaying strip center. Having been busted once before, Barrs was given a 50-year sentence; he spent 10 years in prison before being released on parole in 1983. His parole will end in 2011. He's never been in trouble again, and, now 61 years old, he continues to live a quiet life, just east of Austin where he works as a professional house painter.

1973 was a long time ago, and yet Barrs remains determined to clear his name. "It's time now to try to fix it," he said recently. "I

hope that I can fix it so that when I leave this earth, I can have a clean slate."

Barrs has been working to fix it since shortly after he was arrested in August 1973, and in earnest since he was sent to prison less than six months later. Over the years, he's written letters to everyone he could think of in an effort to get support for a reinvestigation of his case – including to former U.S. Rep. J.J. Pickle, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, and state Rep. Gonzalo Barrientos; to the ACLU, the NAACP, and the Department of Justice; and even to the late U.S. Sen. Ted Kennedy. He has stacks of yellowed court papers, permanently creased personal letters (including a cryptic, handwritten letter from the mother of his chief accuser), and a peti-

tion collected by his mother while he was in prison that contains more than 500 signatures of East Austin residents who said they believed in his innocence.

Thus far, none of his efforts have panned out. Barrs, who has quick, smiling eyes, remains undeterred. He is certain that one day the truth will come out and that people will finally realize he was convicted of a crime he did not commit. "When you go to prison like that and you know you're innocent, you try to say, 'Society is not like this; we've got the best system in the world," he said. "And then you go to realizing, things do happen like this."

Uncertain Eyewitnesses

Just before 11pm on Thursday, July 12, 1973, 18-year-old Linda Yura pulled into the parking lot of the Cameron Village Minimax grocery at 5308 Cameron Rd. She was there to visit with a friend, assistant manager Phil Henning, and to buy some Coca-Cola. There were nearly 20 people in the 24-hour store when Yura, a clerk at the Texas Department of Public Safety, arrived. She'd already walked into the store when she realized she'd forgotten to bring from her car the empty soda bottles she needed to return, she later testified, so she returned to the parking lot. There she saw a two-tone whiteover-red late-model two-door vehicle with "four or five negro subjects" inside, according to the police report prepared by the case's lead investigator, then-Austin Police Sgt. Roger Napier. The car and its occupants stood out to Yura because they were just sitting there. "Because usually when you go to

the grocery store, everybody gets out," she testified in court in January 1974. "So I got my bottles and went back inside and I got my Cokes and I was checking out, and I noticed them when they came in the store, but it was just briefly."

Three of the people Yura had seen in the car had entered the store, she said, two men

and a woman. She didn't pay attention to what they did once inside; she paid for her soda and walked to the manager's area, a little enclosed booth where the store's safe was located, to chat with Henning. When she got there, a shortish and stocky man in pin-striped pants and a leopard-print shirt, one of the men who'd been in the two-tone car, was already standing next to the booth. Yura began chatting with Henning, when the man in the pin-striped pants told Henning, "Tell her to get in there with you." She did so and "just stood there" still talking to Henning, who she noticed

"was opening the safe." Henning handed the man a "big wad of bills."

Suddenly a gunshot sounded from somewhere else in the store. Everyone in the store "kind of just stood where they were," Yura recalled. "They were all shocked."

Yura had not realized that the Minimax grocery was being robbed, apparently by the three people she had seen earlier outside. No one was injured in the robbery; a single .38-caliber bullet had been fired when one of the robbers accidentally pulled the trigger on his gun as he hit in the head a 17-year-old cashier who hadn't responded quickly enough to a demand to empty his register. (The youth, John Montgomery, was cut but otherwise unharmed.) The robbers rounded up the occupants of the store, ushered them into a storage room, and took off. (Neither Yura nor Montgomery could be located for this story.)

No money was ever recovered from the robbery, but not quite a month later, police had arrested and charged four people with the crime: Andrew Lee Jackson, James Hopes, Ronnie Barrs, and Barrs' then-wife, Betty. Barrs knew Jackson and Hopes, but they were not friends. But Jackson had told police that he was responsible for the robbery, he had fingered Hopes and Ronnie and Betty Barrs as his accomplices, and he eventually testified about the crime at Barrs' trial. Yet Jackson himself never went to prison for the robbery (though he did do some time for an unrelated offense). Hopes pled guilty and served five years and one day, although he now swears he had nothing to do with the crime. A Travis County grand jury declined to indict Betty Barrs, who had a good alibi.

Only Ronnie Barrs took the case to trial, where he testified that he had not been involved. He too had a decent alibi, but the jury was apparently unpersuaded by his testimony. Yet the majority of the eyewitnesses – customers and employees of the Minimax – were unable to identify Barrs as one of the robbers. Court records also suggest that those who did identify Barrs did so with the encouraging feedback of lead investigator Napier, who told several who tentatively selected Barrs from a multiphoto lineup that they'd gotten the right guy. Ultimately, Barrs was sentenced to prison for a robbery that many in the store did not even realize was taking place.

Now, so many years later, clearing his name presents Barrs with no easy task. Without DNA evidence and with the death in 1993 of Jackson, the state's key witness, proving Barrs had nothing to do with the Minimax robbery may well be impossible. That doesn't mean that aspects of his case aren't compelling. For instance, there's the process by which Barrs was identified by witnesses. Faulty eyewitness ID is the most common factor in wrongful conviction, present in a staggering 75% of all wrongful convictions; if the eyewitnesses from the Minimax were wrong or coached, does there remain any provable case against Barrs?

On the other hand, even if the evidence was tainted or false, can Ronnie Barrs still hope for vindication?

A Simple Story

Sitting in a corner booth at a North Austin IHOP, Barrs smiles often and laughs easily. His hands are expressive, large – remarkably so for his modest 5-foot-10-inch frame - and rough from years of manual labor. He hasn't been able to work recently because of back trouble, and between visits to the doctor and caring for a grandchild, he spends much of his free time trying to track down leads that might help clear his name. He looks for old friends and acquaintances from the early Seventies and pumps them for information and for additional sources - people who might remember something that could now help him. He grew up in Austin, living in Eastside projects with his mother, Margaret, who worked as a cleaning lady at one of the department stores that still operated on Congress Avenue.

Barrs is charming and apparently guileless and never sounds bitter or angry about his fate. His simple determination to clear his name is in part what attracted Austin defense attorney Keith Hampton to his case. Hampton was sitting in his office one afternoon when in walked Barrs, carrying a worn cardboard box full of documents, "and he wants to get his name cleared," Hampton recalled. "I asked him some questions and realized that he'd served his time and was close to getting off

parole." That struck Hampton, and he couldn't help but wonder, "Why would he go to all this trouble for something that is so far in the past?"

Barrs told Hampton his story. "I was pretty stunned by what I was hearing," the lawyer said. He even called in a colleague to hear the tale, to see if maybe he was missing

something. She was similarly impressed. "This has a ring of truth to it," Hampton said. "This guy seems completely honest."

Barrs' story is deceptively simple. He says he was wrongly fingered for the robbery by Jackson, a man he'd known for years, but not well. Barrs had dated Jackson's sister as a teen in the mid-Sixties but says he never hung around with Jackson (better known as "Lee Lee"), whom his mother considered bad news. Hopes was only an acquaintance; he drove a beer truck during the day and worked nights as a bouncer at the Palladium club on the corner of East 12th Street and Comal. That's the only place Barrs ever saw Hopes, he says, a fact that Hopes confirms. "I used to see him around," Hopes said recently, but the two weren't close.

Why Jackson fingered Barrs for the Minimax job remains uncertain, although Barrs believes he knows. Just before the robbery, Barrs, although he was married to Betty, had begun a very brief affair with a woman he later learned was a steady girlfriend of Jackson's. "I kept my eye on him from a distance," Barrs said, "but it didn't help me out, because when I met [his girlfriend], it set off a fire under him." Jackson

died in 1993, and Barrs has long since lost track of the girl.

Jackson, according to both Barrs and Hopes, was a skittish guy who'd been in and out of trouble for years. When the cops came calling, Jackson always got nervous. He often ran, and in those days running generally ended with a beating, they said (at least one former Austin Police Department cop on the beat in the Seventies confirmed that would not have been uncommon). Barrs says he's been told that whenever the cops squeezed Jackson, he told them whatever he could. Barrs believes that when they came calling on the Minimax robbery, Jackson not only got nervous, he also got even with Barrs.

Based on the available record, the story Jackson told police about the robbery changed officially and significantly no less than three times, including while he was on the witness stand at Barrs' trial. According to Napier's police report, when Jackson was first asked about the robbery he denied any involvement. Later, he said that he and Hopes had been hanging at Martin's Drive Inn, a popular Eastside hangout, when Barrs and his wife rolled up in Barrs' 1961 Ford Falcon. Barrs complained about not having money and suggested the foursome commit a robbery, Jackson first told police. Jackson's only involvement was to drive the group – in

a gold car that belonged to Hopes, he said – and he remained outside while Hopes, Barrs, and his wife went into the store. (Jackson's description of Hopes' car conflicts with Yura's statement to police just after the robbery that the car she saw was actually two-toned, red and white.)

After the shot was fired the three fled, Jackson said, and headed north on I-35.

After additional questioning, Jackson changed his story to say that Hopes had remained in the car and that he, Barrs, and Betty went into the store, and that Betty carried a .22-caliber pistol while Barrs wielded the .38 that fired the errant shot. In that retelling, Jackson said he made off with a total of \$700 and didn't mention the escape route.

On the stand, Jackson's story morphed once again. This time he said there were about three people in the store during the robbery, and that once he and the Barrs were inside, Ronnie Barrs ushered everyone behind the meat counter, where he made them all lie down. The trio stayed together the entire time they were inside, he said, and all three of them went to the manager's booth together to get the cash. No one was in the booth at the time, he said. They left by speeding off north on I-35, with Hopes behind the wheel.

Jackson's various recorded accounts of the crime are not only internally inconsistent, but strikingly, none of the details from any of CONTINUED ON P.22

his three confessions actually match the testimony of the other eyewitnesses.

For example, Ken Dorman was shopping at the Minimax that night, stepped out just before the robbery took place, and turned back to get something else when he heard the gunshot. He saw a black man with a gun and watched through the windows as the customers and employees inside moved away from the checkout area toward the back of the store. From his car, Dorman saw three people leave the store, get into a car, and drive north on Cameron Road. Dorman spotted a patrolman pulling into the Minimax parking lot. "I flagged him down and I told him at that time that the car had just left and that if he wanted to, we could see if we could stop them because they were going on Cameron Road," he testified. The cop declined to do so.

Although he'd gotten a long look at the fleeing robbers, Dorman was unable to identify any suspects for the police, despite reviewing a live six-man lineup that included both Jackson and Hopes, and also police mug shots. "I was never shown any pictures of the people in question," he testified at Barrs' trial.

"In fact, you have not identified anyone?" one of Barrs' lawyers asked. "No."

Contaminated Testimony

Indeed, from the record, none of the eyewitnesses was able to give much of a description of the robbers, though they agreed that there were three of them - two men and a woman - and that they were black. One of the men was described, generally, as tall, the other as short and stocky. The woman was described only as thin; one employee said she'd been wearing bell-bottoms and a halter top. Even Henning, the assistant manager who had retrieved money from the safe, was unable to provide police a description, and he was subsequently unable to identify any suspects from mug shots. He was not called as a witness by either the prosecution or the defense. (Of the nearly two dozen people inside the store, the state called just seven to testify; Barrs' defense called only one, a woman who said she really didn't see anything.)

There was a dearth of usable information to help identify the culprits, and the police report chronicling the investigation is thin and disjointed. There are no diagrams or photos of the store or of the evidence – a deficiency that Napier, the lead investigator who retired in 1995, noticed after reviewing the police report at the Chronicle's request. "That's one of the problems," he said. "I wish we would've had photographs of the building itself, or at least a diagram." (He couldn't recall if such things were once part of the file.)

Barrs' name first appears in the report nine days after the robbery. On July 21, 1973, a homicide investigator told Napier that while interrogating 17-year-old Marshall Hugo Grant about his involvement in a string of armed robberies, the kid said that he knew who was involved in the Minimax robbery and named Jackson, Hopes, Barrs, and Hopes' then-wife, Marilyn. (Grant, currently in the

state's prison psychiatric unit where he is serving a 33-year sentence for injury to a disabled person, did not respond to a letter requesting information.) The same day, Napier brought Yura to the police station to review mug shots, including Jackson's. "She picked the photograph of Andrew Lee Jackson as being the one that looked most like the shorter of the two subjects she saw inside the store," Napier wrote. "However, she stated that she could not make a positive identification based on that photograph."


Napier tried at least two more times to see if Yura could identify the robbers, and at trial, the string of witness IDs of Barrs, however tentative, must have had a cumulative impact. Ultimately, Yura testified that Barrs was the tall man who'd robbed the store. She added that Barrs had come back to the storeroom to tell the employees and customers to stay put, and supposedly said, "Don't any of you motherfuckers move or I'll kill you." (Barrs' attorphoto spread Napier brought to her workplace. "He laid [the photos] out and said, 'Well, if this could have been any of them, could you tell me which one?' And I picked out two pictures."

"All right. Now, were the two pictures that you picked out two of the men who were in that store, or do you know?" Barrs' attorney asked. "Well, now, [Napier] said that he thinks these were the ones that [the police] picked up."

The record shows that Napier either confirmed or suggested that Barrs was the right suspect to at least Montgomery and Matthews. Indeed, during the pretrial hearing, Napier said he'd done just that when asked whether he'd let Matthews know that he believed Barrs was one of the robbers. "I don't think there was any doubt in [Matthews'] mind that it was my opinion that Ronnie Barrs was involved," Napier said. Although Barrs' attorneys, including former criminal defense lawyer Keith were composed because so little documentation is available. But he noted that at least in Yura's case, more than one suspect was included in each selection of photos, and that is also a poor practice. "In a conventional lineup, there is a one-in-six chance of wrongful identification. That's the American standard of risk to innocent people," he said. "It's rolling one die. It's a game of chance."

If a witness is made to feel that he or she must select somebody - as in Barrs' case, where witnesses reported they were told to select the person that most resembled the person they saw - there is at least a one-in-six probability he or she will get it wrong. Done as Napier did it, "he can make it so he has more than a one-in-six chance; he can make it so there is more than one suspect - even make it so that everybody is a suspect," Malpass said. "So, given the identification procedures in this case, it's very likely that one of the suspects will be on trial, whether or not they're guilty."

neys warily noted at trial that it was the first time Yura ever recalled that interaction.) Rodney Matthews, a cashier, also testified that Barrs had come to the back and pointed a gun; John Montgomery testified that he was pretty sure it was Barrs who'd hit him. Montgomery's dad, Charles, who'd arrived at the store just as the robbery was concluding, said that he was pretty sure it was Barrs he'd seen across the parking lot, walking by himself away from the front of the store. Finally, Ignacio Covarrubias said he wasn't positive but that Barrs looked a lot like the man who'd come to the back of the store waving a gun.

Yet none of the IDs were firm, and Barrs believes that it was Napier's influence over the witnesses that had them finger him even tentatively. The IDs were suggested to the witnesses, Barrs recalls. "That's the way it was all during my trial. They went from that to an identification."

The trial transcripts appear to confirm Barrs' suspicions. John Montgomery, Yura, and Matthews were each shown multiple photo lineups, and when they were unable to choose photos, they said, Napier told them to choose someone that looked most like the suspects they remembered. "I didn't recognize any," Yura said during a pretrial hearing of a Kisner, who had only recently graduated from law school, tried to have the eyewitness statement suppressed, Judge Tom Blackwell allowed the IDs to be presented to the jury.

That was a mistake, says Hampton. Barrs' case is "a failure of the courts," he says, and should have been overturned long before now, based on an insufficiency of evidence - the only evidence linking Barrs to the crime are Jackson's inconsistent confessions and the tentative IDs made by witnesses who said they'd been encouraged to think they'd fingered the right person. "The suggestion of an ID, that is a textbook example of exactly the way not to ID someone," he said.

That is indeed the case, says Roy Malpass, a professor of psychology and criminal justice at the University of Texas at El Paso, where he is a memory researcher and a leading expert in eyewitness identification. Malpass reviewed pretrial testimony regarding the eyewitness IDs made in the Barrs case. "Napier appears to have communicated to the witnesses who he thought was the offender, and that is a serious procedural mistake," he said. "It's not just giving [the witnesses] feedback; it's letting them know" who police believe is responsible - and that's powerful. Malpass said it's difficult to know how Napier's lineups and photo arrays

Malpass emphasizes that he cannot tell whether a witness' selection in a particular case was right or wrong. But he can explain what techniques are more reliable for using in eyewitness identification. His conclusion on Barrs' case? "The eyewitness evidence in this case is so contaminated by police actions that I cannot imagine anyone in the criminal justice system these days would give it any credibility."

A Long Time Ago

Even Napier has no doubt that were he investigating this case today, several things would be different. There would be many photos taken, for one thing, and the report would be beefier – Napier notes that he can't even tell whether the police recovered the .38 used in the crime (the report is completely unclear), and if so, whether there was any ballistics testing. "From reading [the report] I couldn't tell if there was enough physical evidence, with the bullet itself, that might've been helpful," Napier said. "I can't tell in there either, and I can't remember." As for dealing with the witnesses, Napier said police always tried to present "similar looking people" in photo lineups, but as far as the composition of the lineups in the Barrs case, he doesn't remember.

That witnesses were sometimes inconsistent or offered few details at all doesn't surprise Napier. "That was always one of the hardest things. Very few people that are involved as the victim of a crime or the witness to a crime can really be that specific about what they saw or what they think they saw," he said. "And in a lot of cases, that's what you depend on more than anything else." He speculates that the changes in Jackson's story - from confession to confession to testimony – might have had to do with "drug involvement." But Napier still doesn't know why Jackson would implicate Barrs in the crime if Barrs wasn't there. "I was trying to think, what purpose would it be for these guys to implicate Ronnie if he wasn't involved? How would it serve them? And I don't see that it would have, but I cannot recall if they made any deal with the District Attorney's Office."

In 1964, when Napier joined the department, there was no air conditioning in the



bare-bones Plymouth Belvederes that the cops drove on patrol. Most of the streets in East Austin were unpaved, which meant, especially in the summer, that Napier would leave his patrol shift covered in a dirty shade of gray. Over the years, Napier earned a reputation for being a straight-shooter - a guy you liked or didn't but who would always call 'em like he saw 'em - a reputation no doubt enhanced by the 12 years he spent in APD's Internal Affairs. "I'll tell you, my gut feeling is that Ronnie was there and he was involved. Based on what I read and what little I can actually remember," he said. "But you know, who knows?" Napier concluded. "Hell, that's been a long time ago."

What Is Whispered

Whether Jackson made a deal with the D.A.'s Office in exchange for his testimony is also unknown. When asked about it on the stand by Barrs' attorney Keith Kisner, Jackson denied it. Kisner pushed, but Jackson wouldn't budge. Yet Kisner recalls now that — although he'd been in jail for months before testifying — after he took the stand, Jackson walked out of the jail a free man. "I asked him if he had a deal with the

Critical to the Success

Pakistan, eh? Pakistan.

At West Point last Dec. 1 the president said: "I am convinced that our security is at stake in Afghanistan and Pakistan. ... In the past, there have been those in Pakistan who've argued that the struggle against extremism is not their fight, and that Pakistan is better off doing little or seeking accommodation with those who use violence. But in recent years ... it has become clear that it is the Pakistani people who are the most endangered by extremism. Public opinion has turned."

Six days later *The New York Times* reported that Pakistani "public opinion runs strongly against the United States" (Dec. 6, 2009, p.WK1). Even before the speech it was well known that "[m]any Pakistanis blame the United States for the country's rising instability. ... [A] surge of anti-American sentiment [is evident] even among the elite. ... 'There is a general perception in the educated class that Pakistan is paying a very heavy price for fighting alongside the United States,'" said one "prominent" Pakistani (*The New York Times*, Oct. 27, 2009, p.6). Public opinion sure is turning, but not in the direction indicated by our president.

"The past" he referred to looks awfully like the present. "The head of Pakistan's chief spy agency ... met with senior officials at letters the Central Intelligence Agency at 3am ... in Washington, where he argued against sending more troops to Afghanistan" (The New York Times, Oct. 6, 2009, p.1). In fact, according to The Economist (Nov. 28, 2009, p.27), "Pakistani generals and diplomats argue ... [that] America must seek a high-level political settlement with its Taliban enemies. ... [S]ome steps have already been taken. 'We've already been talking to the Taliban," said a "senior Pakistani official." The White House knows that Pakistanis high and low oppose its Afghan policy and seek to subvert it. Nevertheless, at West Point, the president said what he said.

He also said, "[W]e are committed to a partnership with Pakistan that is built on a foundation of mutual interest, mutual respect, and mutual trust," while Pakistan's president countered in a *New York Times* op-ed: "[I]n both countries there is deep suspicion toward the other" (Dec. 10, 2009, p.43).

Then things got crazy. Crazier.

A page 1 *New York Times* headline, Dec. 17, 2009: "U.S. Diplomats Face Backlash in Islamabad." "Parts of the Pakistani military and intelligence services are mounting what American officials ... describe as a campaign to

harass American diplomats. ... The problems affected military attachés [and] C.I.A. officers. ... American helicopters used by Pakistan to fight militants can no longer be serviced because visas for 14 American mechanics have not been approved." Visa extensions have been refused for "at least 125 American diplomats." "Pakistani officials acknowledged the situation but said the menacing atmosphere resulted from American arrogance and provocations." What those officials "acknowledged" is that Pakistan does not want to play and does not have to if it does not want to.

They even refused to renew the visa of the American Embassy's one remaining accountant, so goes the report. This was the person empowered to pay them \$1 billion in "reimbursements." When they're turning down money, you know they're serious.

"[M]ost diplomats and aid workers no longer venture out [on the streets of Islamabad] freely" (*The New York Times*, Jan. 1, p.6). Not what you want to hear if our president is correct and "our security is at stake" there.

He said at West Point that one of the "three core elements of our strategy" is "an effective partnership with Pakistan," but clearly

that core element does not exist. Nor did the White House have any reason to suppose it exists, existed, or could exist – at least, not on terms this White House prefers.

Nevertheless, at West Point, the president said what he said. Do you think it's the water?

Something in the pipes? Present and recent occupants of the west wing seem to contract serious reality deficiencies after drinking and showering in the stuff.

For instance, last November a White House national security adviser brought two messages to Islamabad. The first was "that the new American strategy would work only if Pakistan broadened its fight" (*The New York Times*, Nov. 16, 2009, p.1). (Only if!) The second message was a personal letter from our president to their president in which our president "expected" their president "to rally the nation's political and national security institutions in a united campaign against extremists."

But, according to *The Economist*, Pakistan's president "is one of the country's most discredited politicians" (Nov. 28, 2009, p.27). "He is fighting for his political life," agrees *The New York Times* (Dec. 16, 2009, p.8). As is widely known, this guy served 11 years in jail on charges of corruption and murder. Now he is barred from leaving his



country by Pakistan's Supreme Court in order to face civil charges that could strip him of his presidency (*The New York Times*, Dec. 19, 2009, p.8). His interior and defense ministers are in even hotter water. In fact, the court's ruling sent "senior government ministers [scurrying] ... for bail before they were arrested" (*The Economist*, Jan. 2, p.33). As if that weren't enough for a Marx Brothers script, "the government's lawyer" – so goes this report – "made the astonishing claim that [Pakistan] army headquarters and the CIA were conspiring against the [Pakistani president's] government."

Yet our president expects and exhorts their president to rally his people.

The Pakistani army has been fighting Taliban and Taliban-like forces in Pakistan, it is true, but the "army's impressive recent campaigns ... have been directed at terrorists active in Pakistan, not those who cross the border to attack ... in Afghanistan" (*The Economist*, Dec. 5, 2009, p.14). They're not fighting the guys we want them to fight.

As for Pakistan "on the ground," these stats are from *The Economist*, Nov. 28, 2009, p.27: Only one-third of Pakistanis think democracy is best for their country – "the same proportion as [advocate fundamentalist] *sharia* law." Sixty percent say the army is the most trusted Pakistan institution. Half trust religious authorities. (Only half.) Just 10% back the government. "Only a fifth of [the poll's] respondents [have] a full-time job. A quarter of them [are] illiterate." Half of Pakistan's 170 million people are younger

than 20, and "40% of Pakistani children [are] out of school." In 2009 Pakistan's currency inflated at a rate of 20% (*The New York Times*, Jan. 3, p.WK9). When, at West Point, our president said that "America is ... providing substantial resources to support Pakistan's democracy," he neglected to mention that two-thirds of Pakistanis don't much want democracy.

What are Pakistanis to think when this White House warns "that if [Pakistan] does not act more aggressively the United States will use considerably more force on the Pakistani side of the border to shut down Taliban attacks" (*The New York Times*, Dec. 8, 2009, p.1)? Over a year ago, the chief of Pakistan's army "denounced" such attacks and "vowed to defend Pakistan's territory 'at all cost." (*The Economist*, Sept. 20, 2008, p.55). Pakistan has nukes. When an army with nukes says "at all cost," somebody should listen.

At West Point our president said, "[T]here is no doubt that the United States and Pakistan share a common enemy," though he knew most Pakistanis doubt that a lot. He spoke as though no fact I've cited applies. And he did so after three months of deliberation during which Pakistanis told him, in no uncertain terms, that they were not on board.

American commanders "consider eliminating [Taliban and al Qaeda] sanctuaries in [Pakistan] to be critical to the success" of the president's strategy (*The New York Times*, Jan. 2, p.1). If that's true, then, considering the facts, what are you thinking, Mr. President? What, really, are you thinking?

prosecution, and he said no, he hadn't, but he had been in jail for a while and was let out that afternoon," Kisner said.

Yet what hurt Barrs most, Kisner said, was his own testimony. What seems to have cut the deepest against him was his inability to remember what movie he'd been watching on TV July 12, 1973, at the exact time of the robbery. In court, Barrs said that he'd actually been home that night, babysitting for Betty's son. Betty's mother had had a heart attack that day, and she needed to be at the hospital - that was the alibi that likely kept Betty from even being indicted. Barrs said that he had stayed home with 9-year-old Terry; the two had sandwiches for dinner and then settled in to watch a Western called Waco. As it turned out, that wasn't the movie on that night - it was Damn Yankees, which Barrs now insists he had also watched. Waco showed on a Thursday evening, but not until three weeks later. Barrs said he simply confused the two days.

There was also the fact that Barrs had been

to prison before, for three years on an armed robbery beef. He was paroled just nine months before the Minimax robbery. In that case, Barrs said, he was set up for being an accomplice to a robbery of a taxi driver that he didn't even know would take place. Indeed, he said the cabdriver actually testified in his defense, but that was not enough to persuade a judge that Barrs should not be convicted.

Perhaps it was the combination of all these things. But Barrs' jury simply did

not believe his story – even though the hospital alibi apparently cleared Betty. She came to court to testify on Barrs' behalf, but because she had inadvertently remained in the courtroom while Barrs was on the stand – in violation of the rule that keeps potential witnesses from hearing one another's testimony – Judge Blackwell would not allow her account of where her family was on the evening of the robbery. Barrs' attorney argued on appeal that Betty's testimony should have been allowed, to no avail.

As far as the courts are concerned, Barrs' case is over and done. Barrs remains determined. There are problems with Jackson's confessions that no one ever bothered to point out, he says, like Jackson's account of meeting up with Barrs on the evening of the robbery. According to Jackson, Barrs was driving a 1961 Ford Falcon that night, but that wasn't possible; Barrs didn't have a car in 1973. He had owned a Falcon in the late Sixties, but that car had been repossessed in 1969. And although the police report notes that fingerprints were collected from the scene that night, the prints recovered did not match Barrs, Jackson, or Hopes.

There are other clues too, more difficult to follow. On a recent morning, Barrs pulled

from a stack of papers a soft and worn envelope postmarked December 1978. Inside is a letter to Barrs, apparently written and signed by Jackson's mother, Mary. She writes that she had tried to talk to Lee Lee and had even read Barrs' letter to him, "and he said he just didn't want to hear it. I wish I could help, I would. ... I am sorry about all this, I do hope something will help you."


Barrs says Mary Jackson's letter was written in response to one he wrote that questioned why Jackson had lied about Barrs' involvement in the Minimax robbery; he believes her letter strongly suggests that Jackson knew what he had done. When asked recently about the letter, Mary Jackson claimed she did not remember getting any letter from Barrs and denied writing the letter to him – although her other son, Donnie, present when she read a copy of the letter in her Eastside living room, confirmed that it was indeed in his mother's hand. Lee Lee Jackson died nearly 17 years ago and took whatever


secrets he might have held with him to the grave.

Barrs remains undeterred. During a recent interview, Marilyn Hopes, ex-wife of James Hopes, who also did time for the 1973 crime, said that not long after Hopes was sent to prison she confronted Jackson about his story of what happened that night. "He admitted to me that he did the robbery," she recalled - and further admitted that he had lied about Barrs and Hopes' involvement. "He came straight out and told me

that," she said. "I asked him ... 'Why would you do your friend like that?' He didn't want to go to jail." This is the kind of lead that keeps Barrs going – and is the sort of information that might eventually help to clear his name, says defense attorney Hampton.

At least it's a start. Despite the odds, Barrs remains optimistic that he will discover the truth about the 1973 Minimax robbery - a truth that he says will finally clear his name. Barrs says that's been his single goal since January 1974, when he went on trial. "I was sitting in the courtroom with a Bible," he recalled recently. "I was holding this Bible; I was praying; I was thinking, 'There has got to be a supreme judge somewhere, and he has got to look down here on me and tell me what is going on because this isn't right what is going on here.' And I was squeezing that Bible and a voice said, like, 'release that Bible.' And I took my hands up and released it and it fell open," he says, releasing his hands as he remembers the moment. The book opened to the gospel of Matthew, Chapter 10, Verse 26. Barrs paraphrases: "It said there is nothing covered that shall not be revealed; there is nothing hid that shall not be made known." He concludes, "What is whispered shall be proclaimed from the housetop."





THE HORTON FOOTE PRIZE

Honoring one writer by taking care of others

The news last week that a major new playwriting award had been established in honor of the late Horton Foote was hardly a surprise. His reputation as a master of the dramatist's craft had grown steadily over the past 25 years, and this year's posthumous production of his nine-play magnum opus, The Orphans' Home Cycle, on Broadway will only burnish it further. A prize in his name seemed only fitting. No, the surprise was where the award was being established: in Austin, a city to which the Texas writer had no strong ties and in which productions of his plays are scarcer than blue moons. (Different Stages' March production of The Carpetbagger's Children will be just the fourth Foote drama staged locally in 20 years.) So why has this tribute to Foote, which awards \$30,000 biennially to "an American playwright who has written an original work of exceptional quality," come from here?

The answer lies with local film-maker and arts philanthropist Mari Marchbanks, who's been a great admirer of Foote's work since she first saw a version of his *The Trip to Bountiful* years ago. "I was staggered by its humanity and grace," she says. "His words have a quiet power that strikes us at our core. We don't expect it, we never see it coming,

then, bam. We are ordinary, but in his hands, we become extraordinary."


Marchbanks has been wanting to honor Foote for years and thought she had an opportunity a decade ago when the State Theatre Company, then led by Don Toner, was planning to expand into the building just north of the State Theatre. She and husband Greg Marchbanks had the naming opportunity for the small black-box theatre that would go into the space, and she favored naming it for Foote, but then the building ended up being sold, and the space never materialized. Still, the experience gave her the opportunity to meet the playwright at his home in Wharton, and what came out of it. she says, "was Horton's desire to see a playwright taken care of. He told me that whatever I chose to do, to do it for the playwright."

Foote's wish was reinforced when Marchbanks read a McKnight Foundation survey that asked writers how much money they thought an artist needed to live on. "I was surprised," she recalls. "They seemed to ask for so little to get by in order to keep creating, yet the opportunities to make a living with their art are so hard to come by. In late 2008, Greg and I went to New York to see the Broadway produc-

tion of Horton's *Dividing the Estate*. Later, in the warmth of our hotel bar, I started up once again on honoring Horton, giving to the playwright, the economy! At some point, Greg cut me off midsentence and simply told me if I was going to do it, then do it. The only way to begin is to begin. So here we are."

The inaugural Horton Foote Prize will be awarded sometime this fall at a ceremony in New York. The recipient will be chosen from submissions made by a select group of resident theatres that share a strong history of producing new work. Each theatre may enter one full-length drama no one-acts or monologues, and no musicals, translations, adaptations, or collaborations - and the work must be by a writer who's had at least three full-length plays produced by professional theatres. A selection committee will determine the finalists, with the winner being chosen by four artistic directors who all worked with Foote: André Bishop, Lincoln Center Theater; James Houghton, Signature Theatre Company; Andrew Leynse, Primary Stages; and Michael Wilson, Hartford Stage Company.

Marchbanks, who is serving as executive director for the prize,



sees it as an opportunity "to lift the playwright's financial state while at the same time reminding those and future playwrights of this important writer who came before them. I think that time will bear Horton out to be one of America's greatest dramatists. And in my book, he's second to none."

Theatre companies, like bands, break up all the time, but it's not every day that you see one reassemble. That's what makes a new production from the Austin Commedia Society, opening this week at Club de Ville, more than usually noteworthy. The company was last seen in action around the time that the U.S. invaded Iraq – it has, in fact, been defunct longer than it was originally in existence.

ACS formed in 1999 and over a four-year span staged about a dozen original scenarios rooted in the style of – what else? – commedia dell'arte. Its crowning achievement was

the Commedia dell'Austin Festival 2001, which brought together five commedia troupes from across the country and several specialists from around the world for two weeks of classes and performances. Unfortunately, just three days into it, 9/11 happened and sucked the energy right out of the festival and, it turned out, the group as well.

"People were just kind of ready to move on," remembers Aaron Johnson, the group's artistic director. "There was no bitterness. We shook hands, gave each other great big hugs, but it was like, 'We gotta go try something different now.'"

Society members dispersed to new pursuits – graduate degrees, jobs, having kids – and, in some cases, new cities. Johnson himself relocated to South Bend, Ind., where he worked for a while in an Irish pub run by the parents of ACS member Kate Meehan. After that, he pushed on to Chicago and wound up managing a theatre company, then headed west to New Mexico for a brief stint in his parents' jewelry business. Then, last year, Meehan's parents again offered Johnson a job in a new Irish pub they were opening ... in Austin. That brought him back to town and reconnected him with Meehan, who then had the bright idea of seeing if they still had any commedia chops left.


A few phone calls found Paul Joiner and Genevieve Kinney of the ACS old guard eager to play again, and voila! The band

was back together. As they were rising from the ashes of Austin Commedia Society, they adopted a new name, La Fenice – Italian for the phoenix. They developed a new original scenario, *Suitors and Tutors*, and even persuaded an instructor from the 2001 festival, Gian Giacomo Colli, to come down and direct it.

Going back to commedia after several years compares, Johnson says, to riding a bicycle. "You don't forget, but if you don't ride it for a little while, you have to knock the rust off the chain and have the brakes tightened and things like that. It was not a sluggish start, but it was like, 'Okay, do we still know how to do this?' In the last week, everyone has reattained that comfort level [of the ACS days]. We're laughing in rehearsal, having a great time, trying out all kinds of new stuff."

That bodes well for this week's opening at Club de Ville. To hear him talk, Johnson's only real concern is the weather. See, the company plans to perform on the outdoor stage, But he notes that the club's outdoor heaters will be fired up, and he'll be handing out a blanket with each admission. And if the crowd still thinks it's too cold, they'll move the fun indoors. — *R.F.*

Now, the above statement means either 1) nothing to you at all, or 2) you've likely let out a substantial squee of excitement. Perhaps, depending on the level of your affection for or your obsession with comedy improv, you've even wet yourself; yes, *and* we wouldn't blame you.

Keith Johnstone is pretty much the Supreme All-Father of Improvisation these days, the beacon of creativity to so many people around the world when it comes to methods of extemporaneous storytelling. The author of Impro: Improvisation and the Theatre and Impro for Storytellers, the creator of the popular Maestro format and Gorilla Theatre and others, Johnstone, pushing 80, is one side of the ever-twinkling coin of modern improvisation. (The other side of that coin, Del Close, deceased these last 10 years, was a proponent of what's called the Chicago style.) So it's no small change that he'll be here this week, teaching a few already-sold-out workshops and riding herd over some of the best improvisers in town in a massive, one-night-only Maestro showcase at the Long Center.

Why is he coming to Austin in the first place? We put this question to Kareem Badr of the newly revitalized Hideout Theatre, under the auspices of which this series of educational and entertaining events will unfold.

"I wish I could say that it was some sort of magical arm-twisting," says Badr, between gulps of a double cappuccino outside Quack's 43rd Street Bakery in Hyde Park, "but the fact of the matter is, this is kind of what he does. He goes around to cities and teaches workshops. He's done it for a long time. Andy Crouch, the longtime teacher and education director at the Hideout, always wanted to get him down here, but I guess it wasn't until Roy [Janik] and Jessica [Arjet] and I took over that we had the money and the resources to do it."

So Johnstone himself is, understandably, a big deal, but the idea of him coming to a city isn't such a ...?

"When I was on tour with Pgraph [Parallelogramophonograph, the Hideout's house troupe] last year," says Badr, "we saw that places all over the country were having workshops with him. Places like Chattanooga, Tennessee. Literally: Chattanooga had a Keith Johnstone workshop! And I've talked to a lot of improvisers around the country, and they all say that Austin has an amazing improv scene, so, not to disparage Chattanooga, but surely if they can get Keith Johnstone, Austin can get Keith Johnstone. So, yeah, we were definitely willing to shell out the cash to get him down here."

And Johnstone's teachings have a big influence at the Hideout, don't they? He's not the one being brought here just because Del Close is, ah, unavailable?

Badr shakes his head, black curls shifting in the bright afternoon light. "The Hideout – definitely when it started, and still, at its core – is very Johnstone School. I mean, improv is improv, it's all pretty much the same basic skills, but Johnstone comes at it from a different side. He stresses storytelling and narrative, whereas Del Close and the so-called Chicago style are more about, ah, really strong characters and more realistic situations. Johnstone is more about unlocking the inner child in your head and letting the really fantastical happen."

That description brings Austin's duo Get Up – Shannon McCormick and Shana Merlin – immediately to mind.

"Oh, definitely," says Badr, "those two are really rooted in that style. And Shana has studied with Johnstone quite a bit, and she was one of the first people to register for the four-day workshop. Just the list of people taking this workshop is incredible. And almost everyone in the workshop is going to be in Saturday night's Maestro at the Long Center."

Note: The Maestro format is an elimination-style competition in which a stageful of improvisers vie for supremacy, combining and recombining in different groups – duos, trios, and beyond – to play a variety of short games chosen and tweaked by a director. But

'What Does Keith Johnstone Mean to You?'

Andy Crouch, Dean of Education, Hideout Theatre:

"Keith's the guy who got me into improv. Or, more specifically, he's the guy that kept me in improv after the first blush of funny shows and funny classes wore off. I read *Impro: Improvisation and the Theatre* in the summer of 2001 and realized that it was all about way more than just the funny, the witty, and the wacky. It's about investigating what keeps people from being as completely in-the-moment as they'd like. It's about giving ourselves the tools to let go of the need for control and safety – to just play with each other and make stuff happen. And that anybody can do it. Put a human being onstage who is willing to be genuine and vulnerable, and audiences will lean in – and inevitably laugh."

Kaci Beeler, Director of Design, Hideout Theatre: "To be honest, I'm a little afraid of him. He's not an improviser, but an improv director, strictly. So my position is much different than his. But Keith Johnstone, to me, represents the idea of constant thought in an art form. I didn't realize it until I took a workshop with him in San Francisco in 2006, but he doesn't stick firmly to one strict variation of improvised theatre. His ideas are always shifting. He sees the art form as the open place that it really is,

and he manipulates it to make the kind of theatre he wants to see. That's a powerful thing to learn: To create what you want, instead of trying to copy what others think is the 'right way.'"

Shana Merlin, Prinicipal, Merlin Works Institute for Improvisation: "When I saw Keith Johnstone teach and direct for the first time, what impressed me most is that he saw the improv coming from a mile away. A scene would start, and I would have no idea where it was going, and he would pause the scene and knew exactly where it was going. Or, better yet, had four or five excellent ideas about where it could go. This made it so he could direct improvisers so effortlessly that it seemed like he wasn't doing anything at all - which made the students in the class look brilliant, as if they'd done it all on their own. I came away from that summer in Canada with the goal of seeing improv the way Keith did, seeing the whole game play out in the moment and in the future at the same time. It makes me think of an article I read about how Roger Federer plays tennis, how for him the tennis ball is huge and slowly makes its way across the net, because he just sees things so far in advance and can react so quickly. It's actually a different game for him than it is for you and me."

Shannon McCormick, Artistic Director, Gnap! Theater

Projects: "Having Johnstone here in Austin is like having Jack Kirby or Harvey Kurtzman or Will Eisner with us to talk about comics, or, hell, having Duke Ellington or Louis Armstrong to talk about jazz. He was responsible for helping give birth to an entire mode of cultural expression, an art form previously unknown. And his importance is still sort of undervalued in the United States improv community. This isn't my analogy, it's Jeremy Lamb's, but Chicago-style improv is U.S. football, while Johnstone is soccer: predominant in the rest of the world. Or else Johnstone is Alfred Wallace to Del Close's Darwin, Leibniz to Viola Spolin's Newton. OK, I'm getting into the weeds here, but I'm tossing those genius names out there for a reason."

Jeremy Lamb, Founder and Director, Out of Bounds Comedy Festival: "He's my guru. Without him, I would still be doing Whose Line rip-offs in bars. Johnstone started giving actors the tools and guidelines to tell solid stories without a script 40 years ago! Watching him direct or teach is like watching a gazelle leap; you rarely get to see it in person, but when you do, you can't believe how effortless it seems and how amazing it is."

"Improv is improv, it's all pretty much the same basic skills, but Johnstone comes at it from a different side," says Badr. "He stresses storytelling and narrative. Johnstone is more about unlocking the inner child in your head and letting the really fantastical happen."

do all Johnstone workshops end with a performance of Maestro?

"I don't think it happens *all* the time," says Badr, "but it happens often enough so that, when we mentioned it as an idea, his people were like, 'Oh yeah, he can do that.' I don't think all of his workshops end with a Maestro, because not everyone *plays* Maestro. And

one of the reasons we figured we could do it is that so many of the people taking the four-day workshop are sort of ... well, not *legends*, exactly, but, ah, *fixtures* here. At

least half that class are *fixtures* in the Austin improv scene. Shana's in it, and Bill Stern, Jill Bernard, Kaci Beeler, Jeremy Lamb – people who left Austin *are flying back to take this workshop*. There'll be between 20 and 25 people onstage, and they're all intimately familiar with the Maestro format: It's been a mainstay at the Hideout for years. I've never seen Johnstone direct a Maestro, and I'm


really curious – because it's *his* show, and he has very strong ideas about it."

And so, though it was such short notice, why, the Long Center simply rearranged its finely wrought schedules and flung wide its well-made doors for this event?


Badr laughs, setting his coffee cup aside. "No, actually, the Hideout's community liaison



\$200. Thank you, Mother. It's warm and luxurious during this bleak no-frills season.



DAY OUT OF DAYS: STORIES by Sam Shepard Knopf, 304 pp., \$25.95

There's a decapitated head rolling around these stories. Let's just start with that. It's an easy symbol – doesn't try not to be, really – of a writer's relentless monologuing, of the hody's demice, and maybe of other

really – of a writer's relentless monologuin of the body's demise, and maybe of other things. It chatters and muses and manipulates some poor guy who finds

it on the side of the road. The head reappears from time to time, as do other characters and storylines, as Shepard's stories careen about the West, Midwest, South, and, occasionally, Mexico; "the Road is not a Movie," says one narrator in classic denial, but it may well be a storymaking pinball machine. Shepard is a man of his Kerouac-drunk time and hardly the first or last to idealize the open road, the

cowboy, and the reckless, almost amoral qualities of the American spirit, but he's one of the remaining few actually born to it.

Perhaps unintentionally, Day out of Days drains any romanticism that may be left in that tired, womanless mythology. Its best stories rub irritably against the twin defla-

tions of age and the 21st century: A family's Cancún vacation suffers under marital suspicions; a man chases memory in a hotel on the outskirts of Indianapolis, with an endless true-crime show looping in the background; Fats Domino's rescue from Katrina's floods is retold by an airline passenger, maybe as complete fiction; a man with a bad heart


counts his pills and takes to vigorous, solo snowshoeing in defiance of mortality. Snippets of historical interjection - tales of Howlin' Wolf. Sacajawea, Casey Jones, Carrie Nation, Man o' War, Eric Dolphy - deepen both the context and the loneliness at the book's core, and while Shepard occasionally falters with underwritten poetry or clichéd scenes of macho brooding, the book's meditative patchwork encourages us to forget the lapses.

Day out of Days forms a pastiche of the cinematic cowboy at twilight, a thinker

and drinker whose sadness and self-mockery and dismay save him from the preening selfimportance that afflicts many of his peers; he's left knocking about eternally, like one of Dante's sinners, driving because he

doesn't know what else to do. Maybe it's a country for old men after all.

RANSOM: A NOVEL by David Malouf Pantheon, 240 pp., \$24

Like the Beatles' impact on rock & roll, the themes and tropes of Homer's *The Iliad* stretch so widely and ubiquitously through the world of literature they are often imperceptible. One can trace the

very idea of literature back to the Greek epic poet. As homage, or perhaps as a literary high-five to Homer, Australian writer David Malouf reimagines in *Ransom* the final few books of *The Iliad*.

Both authors' stories go something like this: As revenge for the death of his soulmate, Achilles kills Hector and keeps the body, causing Priam, the king of the Trojans, to ransom his dead son by throwing himself at Achilles' feet. And while Brad Pitt's *Troy* turned *The Iliad* into a story of rippling

abs and action, *Ransom* transforms the classic to end all classics into a character study.

Malouf delves into the personalities behind *The Iliad*'s closing action, often with great rewards for the reader. *Ransom* makes clear just how revolutionary Priam's actions were for the culture of the time. Other passages read like a dissertation written in the style of Tom Stoppard's *Rosencrantz and*

Guildenstern Are Dead but without the humor. If R&G was built on Hamlet's deleted scenes, then Ransom is akin to the director's cut of

The Iliad – albeit with a new director. The trek from Troy to Achilles' tent takes Homer 150 lines and Malouf 50 pages. Much of that time Malouf spends in the head of

Priam as he comes to the realization that he has led a charmed and largely symbolic life devoid of the little things that his traveling companion holds dear (a companion who doesn't exist in the original). Where The Iliad tells of an emotional Priam denouncing his other sons as disgraces, Ransom depicts a scene not unlike an episode of Dr. Phil: a bit of repression and some tough love. Malouf also struggles with the task of updating the language while retaining a modicum of the original's

poetry. The result is sometimes smooth but more often overwrought.

Malouf rightly suspected the last two books of *The Iliad* are some of the best fodder for literary expansion. For such a short novel, *Ransom* is packed with ideas and thoughtful touches, but, frustratingly, they end up amounting to much less than the effect of the original's final pages.





A Great Wine for French Beginners

The **Languedoc** wine region of France is a huge area, encompassing the Mediterranean part of France from the border of Spain all the way over to Provence. It is currently the single largest wine producing area in the world, and up until the last decade, it routinely outproduced all of California – though it's never had a great reputation because most of its wine was produced for the cheapest of grocery store markets.

However, there's no reason why the Languedoc can't make wines that compete with the best in the world. The weather is fairly benign, there are thousands of acres of old vines, and many of the world's best wine companies see great possibilities in making high-quality Languedoc wines. For readers wanting to understand why so many people are nuts about French wines, this is a great place to start, since the wines are still fairly priced.

One of the U.S.'s most Francophile wineries, Clos du Val, is investing its resources in

Domaine de Nizas. The company is producing six different wines, all less than \$20 and all well worth the price. The winner

of the bunch for cost/quality ratio is **Domaine de Nizas Rouge** (\$17). This is an AOC wine, which means it's one of the more tightly regulated wines of France. In this case, it's made from 60% Syrah, 35%

Mourvèdre, and 5% Grenache Noir, all of which are grown on the winery's estates. The resulting wine is clearly French in flavor, yet it also has the fruity richness that California wine drinkers expect. Enjoy it with a steak, a burger, or any other grilled meat.

Domaine de Nizas Rouge is available at Costco's north store, which is selling the 100 or so bottles in stock for just \$13, a great bargain. It's also available by special order at better wine shops.

Gourdough's

1219 S. Lamar, www.gourdoughs.com Daily, noon-2am (it's a trailer; take cash)

"Big. Fat. Donuts." That's what is promised on the side of the gleaming Airstream trailer that's home base for Gourdough's. It's nestled into a lot on South Lamar that was once promised to a condo, just north of the Genie Car Wash, and across from

Maudie's Too. Owners **Ryan Palmer** and **Paula Samford** opened the spot in October, and it's been kryptonite for diabetics ever since.

A couple dozen options are posted on the menu, and you're encouraged to create your own from the garnishing ingredients listed.

Each 5- to 6-inch across doughnut will set you back \$3.25 (add a dollar more for meat versions, and yes, there are savory varieties with meat). All of the doughnuts are cooked after you order them, so it takes a few minutes, but rest assured, it will be freshly fried, piled high with whatever goodies you selected, and warm when it reaches you. One of these beauties is a meal.

It seems like there is one basic batter that gets slightly modified for several of the variations. It is cakey or shortcakey, fried up with a nicely crispy exterior, and a moist, rich, buttery interior (very moist and rich if you select one of the options with a filling inside). All of the flavoring accoutrements seem to be of a high quality, and these folks do not scrimp in the least. You get a calorie bomb that will satisfy any sweets craving for hours (and hours).

We've tried the **Razzle Dazzle**, which has a raspberry filling and dense fudge icing. Raspberry and chocolate? How can that be wrong? **Porkey's** has cream cheese topping with fried Canadian bacon and a slightly assertive jalapeño jelly (or you can sub the spicier habanero jelly). The balance of sweet and savory is a nice twist. Sometimes you just want simplicity, and the **Naughty & Nice** fits the bill with a dusting of cinnamon sugar.

Like to people-watch? This is a great place to eat your doughnut at one of the tables and watch the giggling stoners try to decide what to order. The trailer is open until 2am, so the late night crowd is always a hoot. And yes, these doughnuts definitely make your ass look fat, but who cares? They're worth every bite.

Peace Through Pie

Bringing the community together around the table

Two words describe my reaction when artist and lecturer Luanne Stovall and I met for the first time over coffee last year to discuss her idea of a communitywide pie social to celebrate the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday: Shock and Awe.

Since 1995, Stovall had been serving pie to friends and family as a way of coming together to celebrate Dr. King's birthday, but last year she moved the homage into the public domain by inviting the members of Sweet Home Missionary Baptist Church to host an inaugural Dream Pie Social. The Clarksville church, which was founded by freed slaves, agreed, and on Jan. 17, 2009, homemade pies, a children's program, and a silent auction generated a lively gathering of 200 participants, good will, and conviviality and raised \$1,000 for a much needed handicap access ramp for the church.

More than 20 years earlier, I also envisioned that food would be part of the MLK Day observance when I proposed that the Los Angeles Times Food section be the first to salute the slain civil rights leader with a menu of his favorite foods. The paper declined. I interviewed marchers and others who participated in his nonviolent crusade against segregation anyway, including Myrlie Evers-Williams, asking each of them to suggest a theme or suitable food type. Myriad ideas came to mind: International to salute his global vision? Soul food because he was a black man? Southern to acknowledge his home and the focus of his work? On Jan. 9, 1985, the Los Angeles Wave, a community paper, published my story, which encouraged readers to make a Southern-styled dinner menu part of their observances. Since then, even though Americans commemorate other holidays with food rituals, there is still no universal tradition that honors Dr. King's legacy.

But, a pie social? The notion needed some research.

The tradition of neighbors coming together to share pie can be traced to lavish Roman banquets during which aristocrats gorged themselves for days on exotic delicacies, fine wines, and rich pastries - including "huge, two- and three-crust pies filled with filets of fish, chicken, songbirds, and meat, seasoned with eggs, herbs, wine sauce and spices," according to Marcus Gavius Apicius, a first century Roman nobleman and gastronome who is credited with writing history's first cookbook, De Re Coquinaria.

These ancient flat-dough creations inspired numerous pie concoctions and customs, including the pie social - a way for family and friends to gather and share pie. Industrious African-American educators, including Mary McLeod Bethune and Charlotte Hawkins Brown, adopted the pie social tradition in the early 20th century, selling sweet potato pies to raise money for the community and to fund education, independence, and freedom. And, evidently, Dr. King loved pie.

Without hesitation, I joined Stovall's grassroots movement, and we began rekindling the pie social as a way to embrace Dr. King's dream of equality. The vision of the ServeaDream Organizing Committee is that a new ritual will be associated with the King holiday and that the entire community will share in the world's pie.

The group is made up of an eclectic but passionate mix of community leaders and organizers, food professionals, and clergy. In addition to establishing a food tradition for the King holiday, the committee hopes to raise funds that will be used to support the home-



less and build restoration funds for two important cultural landmarks, Sweet Home Missionary Baptist Church and the Limerick-Frazier House in East Austin.

Beginning this week, pie social events are planned throughout the city wherever there is an oven. These include:

- · a piemaking field trip to the Kitchen Space for students in the Travis County Day Enrichment Program;
- a homemade pie auction and program at Sweet Home Missionary Baptist Church;
- a pie-sharing program sponsored by Texas Pie Kitchen, which feeds the homeless at Austin Resource Center for the Homeless; and
- a Pie4All Dream Pie Social featuring area restaurants at the Austin Area Heritage Council's Cultural Festival following the MLK March. For details and schedules, which are still emerging, visit www.serveadream.org.

Spontaneity is just part of the vision, says Stovall, who believes that anyone, anywhere, can share pie stories and be part of the celebration. "Every January, during the coldest, darkest time of the year, we can look forward to the aroma of delicious pies baking in the oven," she explains. "Any gathering can be a Dream Pie Social, and any pie can be a Dream Pie if it is served with that intention. Participants simply need to be willing to encourage friends near and far to join them in January and all year-round in events that can include community service projects involving pie, pie auction fundraisers, pie gatherings in restaurants, and pie-baking talent contests. The possibilities are limitless."

With these "three golden rules for a Dream Pie Social" in mind, the committee expanded the invitation to the entire Austin community to share pie donated by restaurants, bakeries, and private chefs as an opportunity for citywide fellowship and fundraising. The Pie4All Dream Pie Social celebrates Dr. King's legacy while uplifting diversity and multiculturalism in the city. The march begins at 9am at the MLK statue on the University of Texas campus, proceeds to the Capitol for a brief program, then concludes at the Cultural Festival on the his-



toric campus of Huston-Tillotson University.

Funds raised at the festival benefit the SANDE Youth Project, a 501(c)(3) food and heritage program, which I founded with just \$500 and the promise of lease space in a city of Austin historic landmark, that teaches basic cooking skills and nutrition to at-risk youngsters. The program will be located in the restored Limerick-Frazier House at 810 E. 13th, which is the last standing building associated with Samuel Huston College, now Huston-Tillotson University.

SANDE uses food to teach 10 core values to children in the areas of spirituality, attitude, nutrition, deeds, and emotions. The program is based on public health evidence that engaging children in basic meal planning and preparation encourages them to try new and healthy foods, which may reduce development of diseases with diet as a risk factor, enrich academic achievement, and inspire personal and civic responsibility.

SANDE also seeks to preserve and celebrate the rich legacy of culture and hospitality at the Limerick-Frazier House, which is recognized for its 100-year-plus history as a "practice house" where domestic arts and science students pursued educations in home management, increased their literacy, and engaged their creative entrepreneurial skills through fundraising suppers.

A House, Then a Home

Professor John and Laura Frazier were not discouraged by the rudimentary facilities they encountered when they moved to Central Texas at the turn of the century. As children of former slaves, they expected them. So the young couple, who came Austin to begin careers dedicated to education at Sam Huston College, did what came naturally: They rolled up their sleeves. Bonded with the neighboring community. Pooled resources. And eventually dipped into their own personal well-spring for the greater good.

As part of a communitywide strategy to accommodate the growing student enroll-

ment at the private black college and to expand the school's severely limited physical plant, the Fraziers dedicated part of their home – which was built in 1876 by stonemason and real estate investor Joseph Limerick and his wife, Elizabeth – to the school.

(Deed records indicate that the Limericks lived near this location but didn't occupy it. The property was purchased by Austin businessman A.J. Adkisson and his wife, Abigale, on April 10, 1880, then by the Herrick family, W.D., W.T., and Sue, in 1893. The home remained in the Frazier family, cared for by the math professor's wife and children, Mason, Laurene, and John S., into the 1970s.)

According to the Weekly Bulletin annual catalog edition of Samuel Huston College, 1914-1915, the Eliza Dee Industrial Home opened with accommodations for 14 girls, but as many as 20 to 25 crowded in during the first year. The aim of the home was "to develop Christian character and to teach economy, energy and neatness in domestic science." The Home Economics Department students didn't conduct pie socials at the Eliza Dee Industrial Home for girls, but they did help to raise funds for a new \$20,000 domestic arts building by creating and selling tickets to an exclusive "Jitney" supper, described as a "glorified cafeteria with all the trimmings." The suppers earned "much praise," were heralded as "a success," and contributed to the construction fund for the new building that was eventually located on the corner of East Avenue and 12th Street.

By midcentury, the regal two-story had become a pillar in East Austin society – establishing a reputation as a cornerstone in the lodging industry and functioning as a boarding house and hotel for African-American tourists and traveling students during Jim Crow segregation.

SANDE was designed to continue this tradition of hospitality and service at Limerick-Frazier House by motivating young people toward productive futures in the

culinary arts. And it is inspired by two Old World traditions: the concept that children learn life skills at home and an African custom where parents take responsibility for transitioning children to adulthood. The program adopts a similar philosophy to develop self-esteem and knowledge in underprivileged children; implements an equally creative and unique approach to communicate nutrition and fitness concepts that also enhance math, science, and writing skills; and provides opportunities for community service.

If you ask famous chefs what inspired them toward culinary careers, they will tell you that their love of food and passion for cooking developed at a young age, usually in Mother's kitchen. As a rite of passage project, SANDE students join a culinary family when they learn to cook with culinary role models at the Limerick-Frazier House. Partnerships are being discussed with Central Market, Les Dames d'Escoffier, Eastside Memorial Green Tech High School, the Institute of Hospitality & Culinary Arts at Travis High School/Austin Independent School District, and the University of Texas' Division of Diversity and Community Engagement to engage a diverse community of volunteers as mentors to teach technical competencies and lead practical activities that build life skills and increase self-esteem in disadvantaged children.

And the SANDE experience won't just be limited to healthy cooking classes. When the kids aren't stirring creative concoctions in its historic kitchen, the Limerick-Frazier House will serve the community as a museum and community center, with exhibits of historic artifacts, a library of rare cookbooks, artistled workshops and demonstrations, and organic gardens. Within three years, the plan is for the kids to produce their own pastries to be sold in the Limerick-Frazier gift shop.

Students at SANDE will also learn cultural and family traditions, interview neighbors, and learn culinary history so they see all the ways people, experiences, and decisions shape the world. Through a cookbook writing and publishing project, SANDE students will find their own role to play in the community and develop a sense of dignity and independence as they create their own unique written legacy for the future.

And, of course, they'll serve up pie during the ServeaDream Dream Pie Social at Huston-Tillotson.

The hope is that through ServeaDream, SANDE will begin teaching important life lessons, such as strength, tolerance, and patience, in a casual, family setting and will eliminate the barriers that exist between young people interested in culinary careers and food industry professions, while the community at large uplifts diversity, encourages inclusiveness, and achieves "peace through pie."



HE'S NOT A LAWYER, BUT HE PLAYS ONE ON TV

Austin actor Mehcad Brooks on his circuitous path from star athlete to Southern vampires and L.A. law on an Irving soundstage

Consider it a lesson in following your dream. Austin native Mehcad Brooks is clad in an expensive suit, sitting in a swanky, wood-paneled Los Angeles law office as he tells his tale. Strike that. This November day Brooks is in the Studios at Las Colinas in Irving, Texas, on the make-believe set of ABC's television series The Deep End, a lawyer "dramedy" which opens a six-episode run Jan. 21. But his acting dream is 100% real.

The son of former
Cincinnati Bengals receiver
Billy Brooks and Austin
American-Statesman editorial
writer Alberta Phillips, Brooks
was a star basketball player
at Anderson High School in
the late Nineties. But it
wasn't his dream. He started
acting in plays at school and
around town at age 15. Then
he went to an arts enrich-

ment program at
the University of
Texas and saw his
first opera. "I didn't
fall asleep," Brooks
says with a grin.
"There was a gentleman from
Houston who
looked like me and
grew up in similar
circumstances. ...
He was traveling
the world singing
opera – in Italian. I

thought that was so cool. I thought, 'Wow, I didn't know that was a career choice.'"

While opera wasn't in Brooks' future, it clued him in to what was. "I realized at 16 or 17 that if I didn't play sports for the rest of my life, I'd be fine with it, but if I didn't act, I wouldn't know what to do," he says. When he tried to quit the basketball team, coaches called his home urging his return to the

court, and others told him he was throwing his life away. "I said: 'Really? I got quite a few academic scholarships and a 4.0,'" Brooks remembers. He eventually had to resort to faking seizures while on the court to hammer his point home. "I was doing a stage production of *Othello* at the time, and he's an epileptic, so it was preparation," Brooks says.

Brooks moved to Los
Angeles in 1999 to attend
film school. In his junior year
he returned to Austin over
winter break to work as an
extra on the comedy *The*New Guy. He also heard
about Richard Linklater's
plans to shoot a high school
football film tentatively titled
Friday Night Heroes with
Terrence Malick producing.
Linklater "was in the callback
stages, and I snuck in,"
Brooks says. "I ended up

getting a lead." Brooks dropped out of college and moved back to Texas, where Linklater had arranged to film the Bay City High School football team for the film's pseudo documentary focus with Brooks and the other main actors close by. "We had to go into all the games," Brooks says. "He integrated us into the actual team." But the project was never completed, likely



because of Peter Berg's rival Friday Night Lights film that was moving forward with Billy Bob Thornton. "He's a great guy," Brooks says of Linklater. "I credit him with kick-starting my career."

Back in Los Angeles, Brooks was hired for four episodes on the television series *Boston Public*, but spent much of the next two years washing the windows


of Beverly Hills storefronts before roles in the basket-ball film *Glory Road* and the television series *Desperate Housewives* set his career into high gear. "I was wearing this uniform, carrying these huge buckets of water and these mops," he remembers.

"People would just treat you like crap. It wasn't a year later that I was going into these same stores to be fitted for the SAG awards. These exact same people who were working there didn't recognize me from wearing the uniform. I saw how differently they treated me. I was astounded by how L.A. is."

The Deep End follows Brooks' stint as Eggs in the HBO series True Blood and is set in that very Los Angeles. It follows five recent law school grads recruited for a prestigious law firm. (See this week's "TV Eye," p.41, for more on The Deep End.) "I liken him to a young Barack Obama meets Jeremy Piven's Ari from Entourage," Brooks says of his character Malcolm Bennet. "He's a charming, lovable, straightforward douche bag. He doesn't sugarcoat dvd anything. We all have watch those people who tell us things we don't want to hear, but they're always right. He's not insensitive, but he's been through a lot in his life. He's smarter than me, which is fun to play."

Don't underestimate Brooks in either the areas of smarts or passion. "I have the luxury of doing jobs that challenge me, that I would get a kick out of watching," he says. "I'm very ambitious. My heroes are Clint Eastwood, George Clooney, Will Smith, Denzel Washington - people who are at the top of their game because they've worked that hard to get there. I really want to achieve as much as possible in that realm. And then move on to my next career."

The Deep End premieres on ABC Thursday, Jan. 21, at 7pm.

In 1889, novelist Jerome K. Jerome penned *Three Men* in a Boat, a quintessentially English tale of a trio of pleasant but bumbling gentlemen taking a trip up the River Thames and ending up hopelessly, haplessly, charmingly stuck in silly situations. In 2002, the BBC took that idea, replaced the boat with cars, the Thames with test tracks, and called the end result Top Gear. Nominally a car review and auto-news show, over the last decade it's become a massive cult success on both sides of the Atlantic due to its gloriously ill-qualified but enthusiastic presenters. There's the bossy one (Jeremy Clarkson), the small one (Richard "The Hamster" Hammond), and Captain Slow (James May, a man that once got lost on a oneway street). Together, they have worked out that the BBC pays them a lot of money to borrow very expensive sports cars, make rude jokes about Volkswagens, and complain about beer prices. For die-hard Top Gear fans, these seasons are particularly intriguing because they were

originally broadcast just as the recession took hold, and so the threesome contend with their beloved overpriced gas-guzzling executive toys seeming more ridiculous than ever. Yet

for the first-time viewer, the joy is in finding the antithesis of all those tedious infomercials dressed up as gearhead broadcasting. Yes, Clarkson, et al. wax lyrical about brake horsepower and carbon-fiber bodies and bucket seats, but there's a joyous skin-of-their-

teeth incompetency any time they get near a steering wheel. When the three look at the oddball challenges set by the producers, like mopeding up the coast of Vietnam or racing buses, and pronounce, "How hard can it be?," the end result is a vehicle that goes slower than when they found it or that has developed some intriguing bumps and scrapes on the bodywork or is best described as "on fire." Finally, a car show for people who hate cars.

The Body as Canvas, Readying for Life in a Kill Zone

AFS Documentary Tour: 'Tattooed Under Fire'

In Tattooed Under Fire, a young soldier shows off his deeply inked body and says to the camera, "This is my storyboard." It's an eloquent and apt summation of the storytelling aspect of tattooing, and the moment is one any filmmaker would know was golden. Nancy Schiesari recalls her reaction: "I thought: 'Wow. A film student would come up with something like that."

In fact, the documentarian and University of Texas professor would bring a whole crew of film students with her to weekend shoots in Killeen, Texas - 20-year-old kids hauling equipment, holding boom mics, recording the stories of 20-year-old kids embroidering their bodies with tattoos, steeling their minds for tours of duty in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Tattooed Under Fire profiles Killeen's River City Tattoo shop, its deeply caring staff, and six Fort Hood soldiers who spend time in the chairs before going to war, individuating

their bodies in a community that insists on conformity. Schiesari recently sat down with the Chronicle to discuss her awardwinning film, which will screen Jan. 20 as part of the Austin Film Society's Documentary Tour series.

Austin Chronicle: The film is about the intersection of two very traditionally tough communities – the military and tattoo culture. How did you break into those worlds? Nancy Schiesari: I got into it because, first of all, the owner, Roxanne Willis,

and her ex-husband, Glen, who's the senior artist in the film, welcomed me to do the film. They thought it was a great idea. These people are incredibly smart. And they've seen this for many years. They've experienced a war, Vietnam, and now these wars. And both of them are very educated. Roxanne has a master's in psychology, and Glenn has a degree in anthropology from UT. So they knew exactly what was going on; they knew exactly what the significance of the tattooing is. I mean, they're sages in their own way. So they opened their doors and made it very easy. no problem at all. Plus, I cast very well when I crew people. I always took with me young people - either my students or ex-students

or whoever had a genuine curiosity to know what it's like for another person their age to go to war. So I would stand around with these 20-year-olds who were my crew, and I could tell they weren't there just to do a job. It was something that for them was fascinating. Plus they understand tattooing; I mean, just about everybody [of their generation] has a tattoo.

AC: You teach 16 millimeter film at UT, but you shot Tattooed Under Fire on digital video, right? NS: On [Sony] PD 150s/170s. The lowest possible technology, 'cause those are the cameras that everybody had. It made it really easy to grab a camera and go up on a weekend and hang out.

This technology has made it possible for women especially to make documentaries. ... I've seen women M.F.A. students, documentary filmmakers, come up with phenomenal stuff early on when the technology got to be much smaller and when the flip-out monitor happened.

When I started shooting, I was shooting on 16 millimeter, shooting documentary on film in places like Africa and Pakistan. And then it went to Beta. which was also a big deal on your shoulder with your eye in the eyepiece. And so with the camcorder and the flip-open monitor, you're sitting there and you're really interacting with [interview subjects] for the first time. You're keeping your eye contact with them. So you look at the frame and then you look up at them. It's a




Filmmaker Nancy Schiesari on location at River City Tattoo in Killeen, Texas

whole different experience, and it's one that women have been able to enter a lot more easily because the technology has made it a lot more unobtrusive. Women tend to be less obtrusive; they tend to traditionally be listeners. All the qualities women have been fighting against having - being "passive" - are the ones that give you the best results in documentary. Because it's about channeling who's in front of you. Being present to their pain, pride, whatever they want to express.

AC: Have you had to change your approach with the switch to video?

NS: Well, I've been shooting documentary for other people for years and years. My first love is cinematography. And I started making



[my own] documentaries because nobody else was making a documentary on that subject or because, you know, why not? And they all tended to be films about people using a medium which isn't necessarily considered high art but that has some creative strand to it. In my first film, it was a Republican flute band that learns how to play the fife and drum in Glasgow to go and support the IRA in Belfast because they're of Catholic descent. ... And then the second film was Hansel Mieth: Vagabond Photographer, and that was a woman who was an artist and photographer, but she used it as a means to express what was going on around her. She used art, she used photography, as a means to take part in a cultural/social/political experience and to try to make a difference through her art.

And then tattoo is a form of art practice on the body. It was a way of channeling their feelings about the war and about what was going on in their own lives. It was using art again as a way of talking about things that don't necessarily have a voice but speak a language.

AC: How did you go about deciding which soldiers to profile?

NS: When you walk in a tattoo parlor, there's about five or six people getting tattooed. I would kind of cruise. I would wait. I would establish eye contact with the people in the chair. There was a magnet between the ones that were creative and intelligent and wanted to talk. So I tended to gravitate toward these ones. It was just short, quick eye contact, but I knew that they were the ones that would be the ones that were good to talk to. And they were all really smart, articulate, and talented people.

AC: So you basically got a good feeling.

NS: To be honest, I avoided the macho ones, the scary ones. The heavy-duty guys that looked like Marines. They scared me. [Laughs] But then you get someone like Jonathan in the film, who admits to killing a child [in combat], and he's pretty tough. He's beaten up quite a few people. Killed a few people in his life.

AC: Jonathan, who suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder and has done multiple tours, says in the film, "The more times I go to Iraq, the more of Iraq that comes back with me." When you started the project, did you have any idea PTSD would become such a dominant theme to the film?

NS: No. No, I didn't know where it was going to go. I had an idea that war is not a good thing for people and that they were going to come back with something not so good. But I thought they were going to come back injured physically. That I was going to come back and somebody was going to be missing a leg. But, no, they came back with minds disturbed.

AC: As a filmmaker, how do you stay objective in the face of that?

NS: I didn't hold back my feelings; I didn't try and direct [the soldiers] so much as react to what they said. So it was a conversation. I would [ask them], what did it feel like to have to do what they did? Did they ever feel sympathy for the enemy? Things that wouldn't necessarily be patriarchal questions to ask, I would go there with them. And they would answer.

AC: Did you ever feel like you had to pull yourself back?

NS: No. They would ask me: "What's your opinion about the war? Do you think we should be there?" And I would go, "You know what, I'm really not sure." 'Cause you don't know the whole story. I said: "I'm anti-war. I'm against war anyway, because it involves killing people." As Travis [a 23-year-old combat medic] says, "I'm either going to kill a whole bunch of people, or my ass is going to die." It's a no-win situation.

Sink or Swim?

"The first thing we do, let's kill all the lawyers.'

Shakespeare's oft-quoted line from Henry VI is usually interpreted as a mockery of lawyers. In the context of the play, it is really high praise for those who uphold the rule of law for all. However, after viewing The Deep End, the newest law firm drama to hit the airwayes, the critical interpretation of the Bard's words may be more appropriate.

At the core of this series is a group of young lawyers, fresh out of law school, ready to start their careers. The newbies have landed their dream jobs at the high-powered Sterling Law Firm. Dylan (Matt Long, last seen in the superb but short-lived Jack & Bobby) is the most wide-eved. He has a penchant for crying "no fair" to his superiors, but he means well and works hard under the impossible circumstances he's thrust into. Colleague Addy (Tina Majorino, Big Love) is a pushover until she discovers her backbone and earns a small piece of turf. The least likable of the newbies is Beth (Leah Pipes), whose sense of entitlement is galling. And then there's Liam (Ben Lawson), who just can't seem to keep his penis in his pants. Fortunately, Liam and especially Beth make up for their self-absorption by being tortured by ethical dilemmas. And seeking the guidance of their elders, who are thoroughly lacking in humanity, gets them no help. But no one is as awful as the shark tank of senior associates the newbies toil under.

Billy Zane (the baddie from Titanic) has built his career playing foul-hearted cads. Here, he does it again as Cliff Huddle, the associate who's been running the firm in the absence of its namesake, Hart Sterling (Clancy Brown, Carnivàle). While Sterling was tending to his terminally ill wife, Huddle has been molding the firm into a moneymaking machine with the help of his toady, Rowdy (Norbert Leo Butz). Rowdy is the fast-talking associate who lured the young ones to the firm, promising guidance and mentoring, only to cut them off at the knees at every turn. He may have the most complicated relationship at the firm. Brought on by Sterling, a lawyer who still believes in justice for all, Rowdy finds himself swinging between both poles as he tries to placate Sterling while enjoying the spoils that working for the cutthroat Huddle brings.

The other senior member of the firm is the imperious Susan Oppenheim (Nicole Ari Parker). She's married to Huddle and is the only thing keeping her husband and Sterling from tearing each other's eyes out in their burgeoning power struggle. The fifth newbie that will surely become the ball Sterling and Huddle bat between them is Malcolm,



played by Austin native Mehcad Brooks (see "He's Not a Lawyer, But He Plays One on TV," p.39). Hired outside the normal process, Malcolm is already out of step with the other newbies and likely to make Huddle go for the invisible mustache he always seems on the verge of twirling sinisterly.

With a few splashes of color and some wilder clothes, this could be the law firm version of Ugly Betty, the big difference being that The Deep End intends to be mostly serious, while Ugly Betty is a caricature of the high fashion world. Yet, in spite of its primary-col-

ored depictions, I actually like The Deep End. It makes me giggle. I'm not sure I'm supposed to be giggling all the times I find myself giggling, but I'm having a good time, nonetheless.

The Deep End premieres Thursday, Jan. 21, at 7pm on ABC.



The **Parlor** family has extended its matriarchy to include the **Monarch**, the multievent center located in central Austin's Lincoln Village complex, between I-35 and Highland Mall. There's also a weekly Sunday yoga session and private events, not to mention the winter classic Blue Genie Art Bazaar, and some recent upgrades increased the capacity in the auditorium to 1,200, comparable to the outside stages of Mohawk and Emo's. "The biggest challenge is just getting the word out to people and outsider promoters," Mayberry stresses. Rest assured, there will be plenty of Parlor pizza on hand. www.themonarchtexas.com.

Here Come the Warm Jets

The highly anticipated **Sixteen Deluxe** reunion at the **Mohawk** in March will now double as a CD release party. **Bunkhaus Records**, helmed by *Chronicle* Sports guru **Mark Fagan**, is issuing *Year One*, coupling the noise pop outfit's five-song cassette demo from July 1994 – responsible for first attracting the attention of local label **Trance Syndicate** – with live recordings from the release show for 1995's



Backfeed Magnet Babe at **Liberty Lunch**. "It took a full afternoon of going through my cassette tapes to find it," recalls Fagan, who went to high school with bassist **Jeff Copas** and co-produced the sessions with former-**Ed Hall** and then-Deluxe drummer **Lyman Hardy** (another high school friend). "We're excited, and we're at an age where that doesn't happen as much anymore." Help induct Sixteen Deluxe into the Austin Music Hall of Fame by voting in the *Chronicle* **Music Poll**, which closes Jan. 29, and check out the demo version of "Baby Headrush" at **austinchronicle.com/thenextepisode**.

The Dynamo Volition

Austin's **Grooveline Horns** are to Jason Mraz what Grupo Fantasma occasionally is to **Prince**: backing brass section and official afterparty house band. Having previously worked with the Scabs, Willie Nelson, and Dave Matthews, the three-man funk outfit trombonist Reggie Watkins, trumpeter Fernando Castillo, and saxophonist Carlos Sosa, the president of the Texas chapter of the Recording Academy hooked up with the San Diego-based pop singer last year, and plans for an overseas tour are in the works. "Jason raps with us every now and then onstage," relays local MC **Zeale**, who sat in for the last leg of the tour, which included



appearances at the **Frank Erwin Center** and **Antone's** in September. "I was pretty nervous before we went, so we did a little beat-box circle with **Bushwalla** before the show, and that became a bit of nightly tradition." Aside from his Tuesday residency at **Lucky Lounge** with **Boombox ATX**, which also features the Grooveline Horns, Zeale's been making cameos with locals **Los Bad Apples** and **L.A.X**, but his main focus currently is finishing his new solo album with European producer **Marko Jelic** in time for SXSW. "We're on terrain that hasn't been touched," Zeale beams. "It's an original hybrid of hip-hop and electronica, very edgy and aggressive, but with a bit of pop touch."

Random Play

After the Gold Rush: Brothers and Sisters leader Will Courtney is pulling up stakes and moving back to California. "I wish it was more dramatic like some bad band breakup or something, but the truth is that I just got engaged and we sold our house at this make-us-move price," Courtney confides. "All of my old friends are still there, so I'm looking forward to getting back and doing a record."

The long-awaited collaboration between Roky Erickson and Okkervil River, True Love Cast Out All Evil, is being released through indie beacon Anti-April 20. An extension of the Rokkervil mash-up at the 2008 Austin Music Awards, the album pulls from more than 60 previously unreleased field recordings, some of which were recorded during Erickson's tenure at Rusk State Mental Hospital. "You get a sense of Roky's personality in listening to those recordings," commented producer Will Sheff at the 13th Floor Elevators frontman's annual SXSW Ice Cream Social last year. "Roky sounds awesome."

Local pianist and Orange, Texas, native Marcia Ball is joining the ranks of Janis Joplin and George Jones in the Gulf Coast Music Hall of Fame. The induction ceremony takes place at the Bob Bowers Civic Center in Port Arthur Jan. 23.

Once a month, the **Senior Activity Center** (2874 Shoal Crest Ave.) transforms into the **Austin Acoustical Cafe**, an intimate performance space for emerging singer-songwriters. **BettySoo** takes the stage Saturday, Jan. 16, 7pm: www.austinacousticalcafe.com.

Ocinciding with the Star of Texas Tattoo Art Revival this weekend at the Palmer Events Center, Stratocaster master Redd Volkaert is making his Red River debut on Friday, splitting the difference between Honky and Bob Bleed at the Red Eyed Fly.

Kill the Moonlight

Judging by the numbers, the music portion of South by Southwest may have hit the proverbial glass ceiling. In 2009, the annual multimedia festival notched a record number of showcasing artists – about 1,950 acts from 57 different countries - and total visitors, but Music Festival registrants dropped roughly 10%. According to the report by **Greyhill Advisors** presented to City Council on Monday, SXSW boosted the local economy by \$99 million, a slight dip from 2008's \$104 million. "Corporate travel tends to be the first thing trimmed," says Ben Loftsgaarden of Greyhill Advisors. After receiving more than 10,000 showcase applications this year, one-fourth of which were foreign, SXSW now readies for the March dance. "It's going to be in the same ballpark," informs SXSW Creative Director Brent Grulke. "Any decrease in acts would be directly tied to the amount of available venues." Meanwhile, confir-

mations continue to trickle in - besides the 1,000 bands already confirmed at www.sxsw. com. Chicago's lonely hearts club band **Cheap Trick** headlines **Auditorium Shores** Friday, March 19, and for the third consecutive year, NPR Music broadcasts live on opening night (March 17) from Stubb's with a bill that includes **Spoon**, which is taking the Strange Boys on tour soon after. Better still, now that the annual Austin Music Awards have been moved to Saturday night at the Austin Music Hall. OTR might get to stop in for once. Other notable additions include She & Him. Broken Social Scene. Midlake. the XX, Califone, Fool's Gold, and Jesse Dayton's Captain Clegg. Don't expect to see any of those acts at the Bat Bar or **Lone Star Lounge** in the **Austin Convention** Center. Word has it that DirecTV won't be filming the festivities this year.



In June 2009, one month after Sarah Jarosz turned 18 and graduated with honors from Wimberley High School, her first album was released. Song Up in Her Head on North Carolina roots beacon Sugar Hill Records took off, not only in the sales market, where it did respectably, but in critical circles. Rolling Stone praised it, NPR interviewed her, and she appeared on A Prairie Home Companion, as well as on stages in the bluegrass and folk festivals she'd grown up with. On New Year's Day 2010, while the world slept, she recorded with the Decemberists spin-off Black Prairie.

Jarosz stands apart from her peers. She's not Miley Cyrus Twittering her life away. She's not Taylor Swift, around whom she can sing circles. She's not Jewel or Hilary Duff or Shannon Curfman, all of whom preceded her down the teen path. She's not the 14-year-old who giggled to the *Chronicle* in 2005 that things were "a blast." She doesn't use Auto-Tune.

She's the product of Central Texas' rich musical heritage and her own inborn talent. She is also the face of young musicians everywhere. Her triple threat is a marvelously mature alto, a prodigious mastery of clawhammer banjo and mandolin, and songwriting a woman of any age would be proud to claim. Later this month, she'll attend the Grammy Awards thanks to her nomination for Best Country Instrumental Performance on *Song Up in Her Head*.

'Song Up in Her Head'

Teenage girls are the romance paperbacks of music. They're a never-ending, nonstop audience of hormonal angst and bright-pink heartache, an audience that starts when 12 trades up for 13, a merciless time for the heart. To be 14 and female is to experience usually unrequited love with exquisite pain. Never again will you be so unprepared for the soul-crush of love lost than at 15. Even love fulfilled makes 16 pure agony, and 17's got nothing on 18 when it comes to the hazards of love. Nineteen makes no promises when *el corazón* goes *loco*.

Teenage girls make up a ridiculously large and profitable segment of the record-buying public, but they – like the romance authors whose sales keep the paperback publishing industry afloat – get no respect. Not only is the absence of respect outrageous considering the revenue that demographic generates, teenage girls are traditionally jeered at and ridiculed for their intense devotion and fan worship, a quality usually desired in most other musical circles.

Teenage girls hold their own as performers in rock, pop, country, and folk music, commanding idol status commensurate to the tides of popular taste. Charts are packed with one-hit wonders as well as enduring talents who were teenage performers; country and pop music are especially fond of young girl singers. The voice of the teenage girl is so pure, so real, it transcends artifice and strikes the deepest chords

of the heart throughout decades. Jarosz bears career similarities to 1980s pop queen Debbie Gibson, the youngest teen girl to write, produce, and sing a No. 1 song. She's also connected by home state to LeAnn Rimes and Tanya Tucker, Texas teens whose talents took them to the top – on compositional skills giving an edge to their estimable careers. What do they all sing about? The one topic common to all young women.

The voice of the teenage

girl is so pure, so real,

it transcends artifice

and strikes the deepest

chords of the heart

throughout decades.

New love, old love, faded love, unrequited love, sweet love, denied love, misguided love, tender love, lost love, unattainable love, hot love, desperate, wild, bittersweet love. All of it guaranteed at that age to be fleeting, acute, and lethal. Where all is

love, the world is periphery in soft focus, an Impressionist painting with growing pains. The glorious cycle of song, the medley extemporaneous, begets dances at dawn, waltzes under the moon, springtime, flowers, rainbows, and oh yes, sometimes sobering cultural commentary.

Jarosz tackles the topic of love in her songs with guileless grace.

This flame burns brighter with every poem read This bird flies higher with a song up in her head

Sarah, have you been in love? "Yes."

Sincerely, Sarah

About eight years ago, Jarosz's career took shape, though she'd been singing since age 2. Conventional wisdom decrees that an artist must toil in clubs, climbing the long way to the top from opening act to headliner, developing an audience along the way by wowing 'em with that elusive combination of charisma and talent. But the folk and bluegrass festival circuit offers an alternative for young musicians to develop that trickles down into the community. That familial closeness brought Jarosz, winner of the 2006-2007 Best Kid Band award at the Austin Music Awards, onstage during the 2005 CMA Music Festival to salute Earl Scruggs and during New Year's Eve 2008 at Ryman Auditorium with Del McCoury.

At home for Christmas break before returning to the East Coast, she's the picture of collegiate confidence, recounting her accelerating career while sitting inside Nutty Brown Cafe near Dripping Springs and north of her native Wimberley. Clad in jeans and high-heeled boots, a black scarf wrapped around her neck with Boston flair over a cream-colored blouse that flatters her fair skin and ripe lips, Jarosz reflects the late December sky outside in her large blue-gray eyes. Whatever adolescent awkwardness she experienced, growing up agrees with her.

"I really started at the weekly bluegrass jams in Wimberley on Fridays," she explains. "Mike Bond was the ringleader, and to have one of my first experiences playing like that be so welcoming meant a lot to me. And going to festivals around the country. [Colorado's] RockyGrass is a great example. It's put on by Planet Bluegrass, who does Telluride. Being a young musician and a young girl, it was extremely important to be around people who encouraged me. I've been going there for nine years of my life, and it's like a family reunion.

"I was 11 or 12 when I got my first 'tweener' [minisets between major acts] at RockyGrass. I am so lucky that people like Craig Ferguson, who runs Telluride and RockyGrass, and Stephen Ruffo, who does Wintergrass, were willing to let me play.

Old Settler's [Music Festival] too was a huge part of my growth as a musician. It opened a lot of doors that opened more doors. Little things like that built up."

Built up meant beginning a tightrope act of school, lessons, practices, performances, and, somewhere wedged between, a young girl's life. For that, Jarosz credits her parents, Gary and Mary Jarosz, who intellectually stimulated and musically cultivated her nascent career.

"They are not stage parents. They've been amazing, so encouraging, and really made it

possible for me to travel around the country and do so many of these things in music.

"They are both teachers. My mom plays guitar and has written songs. My dad is not a musician, but he loves music probably more than anything. He's one of those guys who can't walk into Waterloo Records without walking out with 10 new CDs."

Crucial in her development as a performer is the caliber of musicians she's met along the way. Some, like Sam Grisman, are secondgeneration players, carrying tradition in their young blood. Others, their names high in the bluegrass and folk fields, like Tim O'Brien, Jerry Douglas, Abigail Washburn, Stuart Duncan, and Darrell Scott, also lent their talents to Song Up in Her Head, as did Alex Hargreaves, Luke Reynolds, Mike Marshall, Ben Sollee, and Tim Lauer.

"I've stood in autograph lines in festivals," says Jarosz. "That was how I met [Nickel Creek's] Chris Thile. I had just started mandolin. It was at the Old Settler's Music Festival at Stone Mountain in Dripping Springs. I was 9 or 10, and he wrote on my program, 'Let's jam sometime.' At that moment, I knew I wanted to be good enough, and since then, he's become one of my greatest mentors.

"I also met the Decemberists like that, at [Austin City Limits Music Festival]. There's a new band called Black Prairie that's three of the Decemberists. On New Year's Day. I'm going up to Portland, Oregon, where Sugar Hill Records is doing a Shel Silverstein tribute. I'm doing a track on the record with them for it. That'll be the start to the new year. Spend the night with my family, then fly out."

Collecting Ideas

"I have been patient in the CD-making process," Jarosz nods.

"Growing up as a young musician, I always had people ask me, 'When are you going to make a CD?' so there was definitely a little pressure. But I always knew I wanted my first CD to be the best representation of my art and music as possible. I also knew I wanted the majority of it to be original songs. So, having been patient, I'd developed a lot of ideas in my head I wanted to include on the CD. That, with [producer] Gary Paczosa's mastery of things and his having done it for so long paired with my newness to it all, was a great match."

That innate understanding of the musicmaking process is a benefit that Austin's sophisticated scene provides to young musicians, and it's turning their coming-of-age into arrival on the scene (see "Bluegrass Up in Her Head," April 17, 2009). In that sense, Jarosz is in a league parallel to the likes of Suzanna Choffel, born and raised in Austin and a product of a scene that made her recognize how "you could play and get your stuff



out there and don't have to be a crazy-big pop star" (see "The Next Fun Fearless Female Rock Star," Nov. 28, 2008).

The making of Song Up in Her Head with her self-composed Grammy-nominated instrumental track "Mansinneedof" also provided Jarosz with lessons reflected in her everyday life. Wimberley isn't Austin, and not even in the same county, but its relative proximity feeds off and shares its energy, particularly encouraging to the composing dynamic.

"Songwriting is a different process every time. It's ever-changing, and I think one reason I like it so much is it's never predictable. Sometimes it just comes, and those are the real gems and gifts when it just kind of happens. Recently, I've tried to sit down and just work at it, but I think that just having things come are how it works. I feel like I try too hard to explain it and it's an indescribable art. For me, it's about being a good listener and not being closed off to the world.

"Writing ideas down, recording a little melody idea, coming back to it and piecing things together, that's how I've been working. Balancing school and work, it's hard to find time to write. Music is constant learning. I have a couple of notebooks, documents on my computer, notes on my phone The ones on my computer

were probably when I was writing a paper," admits Jarosz, who confesses she wrote many of the lyrics for her CD during high school classes.

Years on the festival circuit and her musical background exposed Jarosz to songwriters traditionally cited - Bob Dylan, Paul Simon, a recently developed interest in Joni Mitchell as well as younger, more contemporary players and writers such as Gillian Welch and Dave Rawlings, for whom she flew back here to play a two-night stand at the Parish in December before whisking herself back to the New England Conservatory in Boston and completing finals. "Collecting ideas" is a phrase that crops up repeatedly in conversation, an indicator of her awareness of her circumstances.

"Since I was always surrounded by musicians and people excited about music, it helped me have an open mind - and listen to as much as possible and be influenced by everything. Notice what's good and what's bad and take what you can from it. It's getting harder and harder to be original. Find what you like, and make it your own."

Sarah's Smile

The smile on Sarah Jarosz's pretty face is irresistible as she considers the success of Song Up in Her Head (see "Texas Platters," June 12, 2009), and more so, 2010, eager to work with producer Gary Paczosa again, a summer festival dance card filling up with Telluride and Grey Fox, and an imminent trip to the Grammys. She's aware that eyes are upon her, too, yet her confidence is casual and filled with curiosity.

"Now I feel like because I've done it once, I'll do things a little quicker. Maybe not though. It's always fun to be in a studio for hours and fool around creatively. I feel like I accomplished a lot I wanted to recording the first CD, so I feel like I'm open to newer things, too - no boundaries. I want to be true to myself. I even have a new song called 'My Muse.' It's about someone in particular who's been inspirational, but the idea of the muse is that it's different for everyone. That's why it's

"The last couple of interviews I've had have started going in a new direction. The questions are not so much about where I grew up but are turning to the future. It's good for me because it makes me think and analyze what's really important. I think a lot of that has to do with the fact that I'm not a little girl anymore.

"I'm only 18. The more I live, the more I'll have to write about."

Behind 'Broussard's Lament'

They told us Thursday they would come, They told us Friday they would come, Saturday came and still the dying lived on

It's one of the most striking tunes on Sarah Jarosz's Song Up in Her Head, "Broussard's Lament," one that leaves the topic of love far behind the questions of governmental culpability and human dignity.

"I was 14 when Hurricane Katrina happened, and it was one of those songs that came very quickly in the aftermath of all that," explains its author, Jarosz. "I saw an interview on TV with this man named Broussard, and he was telling the story of a woman during the flooding. They kept telling her, 'Thursday, the buses will come tomorrow; Friday they will come; Saturday they will come.' And he cried as he's telling it.

"I thought, 'That needs to be a song.'

"Those things are so real and human, it's really touched me as a young person. A lot of my songs are personal and about love, so it was nice to write about something else."

The story of Aaron Broussard wasn't simply a sound bite. It earned him national notoriety, a Wikipedia entry, and even anti-Broussard sites (www.aaronbroussard.info). The president of New Orleans' neighboring Jefferson Parish, Broussard made an emotional appearance on MSNBC's Meet the Press just after Katrina in 2005 that caught national attention when he broke down describing the death of a colleague's mother, drowned in a nursing home that was not evacuated (www.youtube.com/watch?v=o9dJjAEVZ4g).

Broussard, it turned out, may have helped create chaos in Jefferson Parish when the levees broke, because, according to Wikipedia, "he followed a years-old 'doomsday plan' in the wake of Hurricane Katrina and evacuated more than 200

drainage pump operators north to Washington Parish. The pumps remained off for more than two days and sections of the parish, including Metairie and Kenner, experienced severe flooding as a result." Furthermore, although his colleague's mother did drown in her nursing home, it appears to have happened as much by operator neglect. Broussard kept his position as parish president and remains a controversial figure in Louisiana politics.

It's sobering to juxtapose the tawdry reality of Broussard's appearance with the bleak reality of what happened when the levees broke in New Orleans. Yet within the murky blur of truth under the glare of the media amid unquestionably disastrous conditions, Broussard's lament, no matter how grandstanding or specious, spoke of a terrible truth echoed timelessly in the folk tradition in Jarosz's song.

For most, the buses never came.

RAY WYLIE HUBBARD

A. Enlightenment B. Endarkenment (Hint: There Is No C) (Bordello)

Any short list of top Austin artists of the last decade counts Ray Wylie Hubbard in its upper reaches. Eternal & Lowdown (2001), Growl (2003), Delirium Tremolos (2005), Snake Farm (2006), one after another, the Wimberley outlaw's output bumps 'n' grinds a bluesman's disposition and the lyricism of a fascist-killing folkie. Like Lucinda Williams, every blessed bon mot



Hubbard drawls sounds lowdown - and eternal. (See also 1997's Dangerous Spirits.) His first long-player since Eternal & Lowdown (another decade best) not produced by Gurf Morlix, A. Enlightenment B. Endarkenment summates itself in a song, Hubbard and Hayes Carll's all-time Texas anthem "Drunken Poet's Dream," originally recorded for the latter's 2008 Lost Highway breakthrough, Trouble in Mind. Tweaked to a finer point here, including Morlix and Jeff Plankenhorn's electric guitars burning a cigarette hole through it, "Poet's" redneck oath - "I'm gonna hollar and I'm gonna scream, I'm gonna get me some mescaline. Then I'm gonna rhyme that with gasoline" - pledges "T" is for Texas and Horton Foote, not for Tennessee Williams. The title track's album-opening chant even whispers mandolin-plucked hints of "The Battle of Evermore," causing heaven's pouring "down rain and lightning bolts." Preachy "Down Home Country Blues" honks barroom, while "Pots and Pans" mattes the platter's overall Heartattack and Vine vibe. Meantime, the lead-off invocation's black sparrow returns as the ultimate bad harbinger (a crow) in "Tornado Ripe," whose harrowing "death and kindlin'" demands the good ol' "Whoop and Hollar" that follows before "Black Wings" beats a campfire dirge. Payday drain and hangover "Loose" could go, but the three closers, beginning with the two-minute sonic scratchboard of "Every Day Is the Day of the Dead," guitar and warnings in Spanish by Billy Cassis, who then helps blow Hubbard's resonator smoke in "Opium" next, hit pay dirt. "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" kicks Enlightenment/Endarkenment shut on Dustin Welch's banjo and Trisha Keefer's redemption day fiddle. Four remains a recurring number in Ray Wylie Hubbard's realm. (Ray

Wylie Hubbard takes scalps at his CD release, Friday, Jan. 15, at Antone's.) **** - Raoul Hernandez

PATTY GRIFFIN Downtown Church (Credential)

After hinting at an affection for gospel music on 2007's Children Running Through, her hugely suc-



cessful last disc, and recording a duet with Mavis Staples on last year's gospel celebration/compilation Oh Happy Day, Patty Griffin delivers a collection of spiritual moments with Downtown Church. The title refers to the album being recorded at the Downtown Presbyterian Church in Nashville, and with her guitarist friend Buddy Miller in the producer's chair, it's another step forward for Griffin the singer. Miller's near perfect in this role; his own LPs always flirt with gospel. But his trademark echo and roar allow Griffin's voice to shine in ways that are dynamic and exhilarating. Covering tunes from the tradition as well as Hank Williams, Big Mama Thornton, and even St. Francis of Assisi, the flamehaired Austin diva stretches into unfamiliar territory. Belying her Yankee roots, Griffin belts and croons like a Texas blues mama on the familiar "Wade in the Water" and the

obscure "I Smell a Rat." There's also traditional church fare like the solemn set closer "All Creatures of Our God and King." Griffin could have skated on the success of her last effort, but Downtown Church is a gutsy move, one that's as haunting and original as anything in her past. (Patty Griffin and Jack Ingram headline the Grounded in Music fundraiser at the Paramount Theatre, Thursday, Jan. 21.)

DANA FALCONBERRY Halletts

Singer-guitarist Dana Falconberry's full-length debut, 2008's Oh Skies of Grey, brought to mind a time of white



gloves, lace, and good manners, channeling Billie as much as Joni. On her follow-up here, she curiously returns to many of that album's songs (see "Texas Platters," Oct. 10, 2008). (Catch Dana Falconberry tonight, Thursday, Jan. 14, at Mohawk.)

SHOTGUN PARTY Mean Old Way

As winter chills, Shotgun Party lev-

els a warm blast of summery swing and bluegrassyfolkie bounce on Mean Old Way. The

Austin-based trio is a perfect target for fans of anything Maryann Price does, meaning their gentle yet lively music is as loaded with bandleader Jenny Parrott's mountain-cool vocals as it is shot with hot jazzy fiddle courtesy of Katy Rose Cox. It's Cox's fiddle that gives the band such personality, beginning with instrumental cover "Draggin' the Bow." On the other side, the unexpected beauty of the bilingual "Y Yo" suggests that Parrott's horizon is broader than it appears, as does the smoky presence of Steve James on slide and Stanley Smith on clarinet on "Run n Hide" and the sly "Kitchen Mechanic." Some of Mean Old Way's sweet new sound comes courtesy of producer Mark Hallman, who imbues the 17 songs with his legendary expertise, guaranteed to warm cold nights with someone you love.

CRAZY HEART ORIGINAL MOTION **PICTURE SOUNDTRACK** (New West)

"It's all magic." That's the phrase the late Stephen Bruton used in

September 2008 to describe working on the set of Crazy Heart, and with good reason. Actor Jeff Bridges embodies his role as an original outlaw songwriter - confident, crooked, and hardened with time. Paired with Bruton's lyricism, co-producer T Bone Burnett's saturated Americana backdrop, and Joel Guzman's accordion brushes, Bridges notches a Tex-Mex trifecta starting with opener "Hold on You" that bodes well against Burnett's other soundtrack selections, including Townes Van Zandt ("If I Needed You"), Waylon Jennings ("Are You Sure Hank Done It This Way"), and Lightnin' Hopkins ("Once a Gambler"). The actor's take on rustic honkytonk original "I Don't Know," co-written by Bruton and Burnett, actually trumps that of

ringer Ryan Bingham, though the latter's dusty theme song "The Weary Kind" captures the film's scope better than Springsteen's "The Wrestler." Bingham's local Dead Horses rip through the roadhouse boogie "Somebody Else," and even Colin Farrell excels in Nashville single "Gone, Gone, Gone." It's magic all right, and a fond final tribute to one of South Austin's finest.

THE SOUR NOTES It's Not Gonna Be Pretty

Songwriter Jared Boulanger must keep Brill Building hours. Last year, the Sour Notes

issued its engag-



ing full-length debut, Received in Bitterness, chased with a 7-inch single. Sophomore LP It's Not Gonna Be Pretty marks the local quartet's sharpest and most cohesive work to date. Opener "Beyond Recognition" splits the difference between the Postal Service and Sav Hi. programmed beats and bassist Elaine Greer's sweet harmony building toward Boulanger's conclusive refrain: "It's all right, I don't mind." In fact, most of the album sticks to the Barsuk variety of indie rock: soft melodies with a vulnerable streak set to a revolving and airtight pop backdrop, from vindictive guitar rave-up "Do-ers & Say-ers" and synth-cushion "One Word Emotions" to the beautifully melancholic "A Cute Little Ruin." Just over 30 minutes, It's Not Gonna Be Pretty is teasingly brief, but thankfully that's an issue the Sour Notes can remedy in no time flat.

ROBERT **GLASPER** Double Booked (Blue Note)

Jazz traditionalists will wish they could have gotter more of Robert Glasper's Trio on the Houston



native's most recent Double Booked, but anyone familiar with the 30-year-old pianist knows there's no sense in confinement. As a longtime collaborator of Mos Def, J Dilla, Q Tip, and the Roots, Glasper's musical tendencies lie as close to hip-hop as they do to traditional jazz, a fact made most evident on the tease of De La Soul's "Stakes Is High" midway through Thelonious Monk's "Think of One." Split into two parts - first half with the Trio, second with his Experiment, which features Casey Benjamin on both saxophone and vocoder -Booked is just as much about Glasper's unique vision (the Bilal-featured "All Matter") as it is his tangled piano phrasings ("No Worries"). Approach it with an "Open Mind."

LEAD STORY

Natives of the Erromango section of the Pacific island Vanuatu recently held a formal "conciliation" with the great-great-grandson of the British missionary whom the islanders' ancestors ate when he came ashore in 1839. Charles Milner-Williams' forebear, the Rev. John Williams, was regarded as the most famous Christian missionary of the era. Vanuatuan legislator Ralph Regenvanu told BBC News that cannibalism was traditionally a sacred warrior practice for "vanquishing a threat [and] absorbing the power of the enemy." Nonetheless, he said, the island has long felt "guilt" and even a "complex" from killing and eating Williams. In penitence, Vanuatu symbolically gave the Williams family a 7-year-old girl, who will not be eaten but whose education Milner-Williams promised to underwrite.

CAN'T POSSIBLY BE TRUE

In November, a Chicago judge ruled that former firefighter Jeffrey Boyle is entitled to his \$50,000 annual pension even though he had pleaded guilty in 2006 to eight counts of arson (and allegedly confessed to 12 more). Boyle is known locally as "Matches" Boyle to distinguish him from his brother, John "Quarters" Boyle, who is now in federal prison for bribery following the theft of millions of dollars in state toll-gate coins. Judge LeRoy Martin Jr. concluded that Matches' arsons were wholly separate from his firefighting.

El Salvadoran citizen Ernesto Gamboa, who worked for 13 years in the Seattle area as a snitch for federal drug agents and contributed to at least 92 convictions for drugand weapons-smuggling, was "fired" by Immigration and Customs Enforcement in May after asking the agency for regular employment. Gamboa originally entered the U.S. as a visitor but overstayed and now aspires merely to an S visa granted to aliens who assist law enforcement. Not only did ICE deny that request, but, according to a November Seattle Times report, the agency informed Gamboa that he should prepare to be deported.

INEXPLICABLE

"It is the Christian commandment to love your enemies and to do good to them. I did that," explained Dan Ross, 61, a retiree in Lehigh Acres, Fla., who in November wired a dozen yellow roses to Maj. Nidal Hasan, the accused Fort Hood spree killer. "Whereas the ministers out there in Fort Hood are praying for [Hasan] ... I went one step further," Ross told the Naples Daily News. The card Ross ordered with the flowers read, "In God's eye, and those who submit, you are a hero!" The Texas florist who received the order notified the FBI.

While reporting on Britain's oldest newlyweds in November (husband, 94; wife, 87), The Daily Telegraph also noted that in 2008, Bertie Wood and her husband, Jessie, of Falmouth had decided to end their 36-year marriage, evidently at a point where they felt they needed a fresh start. Both were 97 years old at the time. Jessie has since died, and Bertie lives in a nursing home.

In November, the Seattle Police Department, investigating a complaint about a beating, interviewed a 25-year-old man hospitalized after being found screaming in pain impaled on a metal fence. He said he had run away from a barroom fight and momentarily thought he was a "ninja warrior" capable of leaping the fence.

IT'S GOOD TO BE A BRITISH CRIMINAL (ACTUALLY, 'UNITED KINGDOM CRIMINAL') (CONTINUED)

1) After pleading guilty in Cardiff Crown Court to forging an uncle's checks worth 41,000 pounds (\$65,000), Hayley Price, 42, was fined 5 pounds (\$8), given a suspended sentence, and ordered to do community service. The judge reasoned that Price was broke, having already spent the 41,000 pounds. 2) Brian Wallace was the victim of a severe beating in Belfast, Northern Ireland, in 2007, stabbed five times and hospitalized with lung and kidney lacerations, and to this day is battling for 7,500 pounds (\$12,000) compensation from a government fund. In December 2009, Wallace learned that his attacker, Simon Granhof, who had been mistakenly kept in jail two weeks longer than his sentence, would receive 12,500 pounds (\$20,000) from the government for deprivation of rights. (Granhof's sentence had already been cut in half before the mistake.)

ALCOHOL WAS INVOLVED

Sean McDowell, 24, was arrested in Ashland, Ore., after attempting to steal a 4-foot-tall stuffed giraffe from the front of a children's store. A police officer had witnessed an inebriated McDowell grab the giraffe and make simulated sexual movements, then walk away, and then return 90 minutes later to snatch the animal for good.

A 'NEWS OF THE WEIRD' CLASSIC (JULY 1991)

In May 1991, Maxcy Dean Filer of Compton, Calif., finally passed the California Bar exam. He had graduated from law school in 1966 but had failed the exam 47 straight tries. After opening a practice in Compton, he was suspended in 2007 for failing to pass the Multistate Professional Responsibility Exam. He remains suspended.





Take a short walk on an old bridge. Several historic bridges around the state have been recycled as pedestrian promenades.

The old Highway 29 bridge over the Colorado River between Burnet and Llano offers a nice view of the upper end of Inks Lake. The steel girders of the bridge have been a landmark since 1937. When a new crossing over the waterway was built, the old bridge was turned into a 1,379-foot walkway. Parking lots at either end of the structure allow off-road access.

The Waco Suspension Bridge was the first bridge to cross the Brazos River, Since 1971 the bridge has connected a series of trails through the parks on



the river banks. Thomas Griffith, who later supervised the construction of the Brooklyn Bridge, developed his bridge-building skills in Waco. Ox-drawn wagons hauled the construction materials

When it opened in January 1870, the Waco bridge was the third longest suspension bridge in the world. The 474-foot span attracted the trail drivers headed north on the Chisholm Trail, even if they had to pay a toll. The bridge turned out to be a good deal for the city, because it helped turn the village into a major trading center for the area's agricultural goods.

In Bastrop, the old bridge over the Colorado River that was turned into a pedestrian walkway in 1993 was honored with a festival for many years. With the new roadway running parallel to the bridge, the 1,285-foot-long span was outfitted with benches and lights. Built in 1922, this was the second bridge at this location and once was a major crossing on the road between Houston and Austin.

The Faust Street Bridge in New Braunfels ranks among the prettiest pedestrian bridges in the state. One of the last wrought iron bridges built in Texas, the 640-foot structure served for 62 years until it was damaged by fire and taken out of service in 1979. Today it connects a series of pedestrian trails across the Guadalupe River.

In Richard Moya Park, south of the Austin-Bergstrom International Airport, are three of the six spans that were once part of the 1884 Congress Avenue Bridge in Downtown Austin. Officially called the Moore's Crossing Bridge, the 534-foot spans were placed here in 1922 and carried traffic until 1980. Now the bridge only carries joggers and bicyclists across Onion Creek as part of two miles of trails.

There is little particularly beautiful about the old Highway 183 Plum Creek bridge south of Luling. What is attractive about the bridge is its location across a scenic little creek under a pecan forest canopy. Built in 1931, it was replaced by a modern bridge that runs parallel to it. This is just a nice place to take a short walk on an old bridge.

Surfin' UFO

David Jewell and the Electronic Planet Ensemble, who gave us their Spaceman:Dada:Robot last year, return in this first month of the new decade with another sonic exploration of

otherworldly wonder and weirdness.

As before, Jewell, an old-school spokenword talent who started out back in the years before poetry was slammed, regales the crowd with his musings on things cosmic and his "Gidget Goes Galactic" narrative of the interdimensional romance between Surf Boy and Space Girl.

"Regales," did we say? Fairly croons, at times, between more staccato stretches of story, like some resurrected beatnik from the Fifties laying down the vibe in a bongofilled coffeehouse.

There are no bongos, per se, in Surfin' UFO - although, if there were, they'd more likely be played by the ghost of Erich von Däniken than by that of the famously bongo-happy physicist Richard Feynman. No, there's an entire drum kit here, lashed into with deep skills and ferocious intensity by Rachel Fuhrer, laying the groundwork for the prog-rock keyboards of Chad Salvata and Sergio Samayoa's badass bass guitar. No coffeehouse vibe beyond the frontman in this show, fellow space traveler: Is this what it would sound like if Hawkwind had been Laurie Anderson's backup band? Close enough for astrophysics.

If you like tales of wacky sci-fi romance, surf movies, and the compelling mysteries of crop circles; if you like the feeling of having discovered a gem of beat-driven space-arena music hidden in the midst of the theatre community; if you can groove to the stylings of a cat in a jumpsuit who might remind you of your eccentric Uncle Dave who has that Fortean Society membership, except that your uncle never had the funky moves and vocal finesse this man Jewell has; if so, then you'll love this the way John Carter loved Dejah Thoris.

Personally, we'd like to see some longer breaks between songs, with simply spoken matter that's more than brief and interstitial, to mix things up a bit. And, musicwise, solos from each of those amazing instrumentalists. But maybe that's something for the next EPE show? Maybe that, like 2012, is drawing inexorably closer. For now, there's this door into a solid evening of spoken-word space rock inside the Vortex's comfortable warehouse venue. And the Anunnaki, those ancient astronauts who genetically engineered the human race into what we are today, are knock-knockknocking at that door. You should join them, space-budget allowing. - Wayne Alan Brenner

Enjoy a dose of humor and musical madness. These former Congressional staffers serve up their brilliant, wickedly funny parodies of popular American songs with political humor that rivals Saturday Night Live. Get ready for some non-partisan bashing of Republicans, Democrats and Independents.





If you've seen any contemporary dance at all, you know how, too often, a movement sequence is broken when the dancer stiffly snaps into ballet mode to prepare for a classical step: "OK, I'm going to do a pirouette now." As evidenced by the

inaugural performance of Voice Dance Company, dancers don't do this in the work of choreographer and Artistic Director Gina Patterson. Nor do they do a lot of fan kicks. Instead, ballet and the classical line are the basis for innovative contemporary movement that is rarely predictable. Performed by a group of very good dancers hand-picked by Patterson from far and wide, the selection of her new and recent work demonstrated that classically based contemporary dance has a pulse – it's alive! – and hinted at further development to come.

The first half of the program was a series of 10 loosely connected segments, some short, some shorter. In "In Time," a Latin-flavored solo, the quiet intensity of Ballet Austin dancer Michelle Thompson was utilized perfectly. So often with attempts at seductive Latin style, the wrists and hands are flipped around grotesquely, resulting in caricature. But here, everything below the forearms was somewhat detached and relaxed, giving the movement the internal heat and outward calm that marks authentic Latin styles as well as updating it with Thompson's own cool athleticism.

Patterson herself danced in one piece. "Elephant Eyes," a duet with her husband and Voice co-founder Eric Midgley. With subtle movements like the gradual flex of every muscle in the foot, a mood of anguish infused their fluid, sure partnering. Later, in "Blindsided," Masa Kolar and Chris Hannon performed a very different duet with a lot of head-initiated contact: His head on her back pushed her across the stage: they ran with heads pressed together and pitched forward; she caught him at the neck to stop him from falling forward. The result was sweetness plus a bit of violence. At times in both duets, the couples reminded me of ice dancers: One moment they're side by side, doing the same thing, then all of a sudden he's facing another direction and she's across the rink landing a triple lutz. And you don't know how it happened, because it's so darn smooth.

Patterson's fresh, unforced humor, and the dancers' ability to execute it perfectly, was a happy surprise throughout the evening, but especially so in "Balkan Chicks," a section in which Kolar and Rebecca Niziol challenged each other in rapid movement series on and around orange chairs from your high school detention hall. Hannon, looking dazed, walked the perimeter of the stage and at times merged into the fun. As with her smooth transitions in partnering, Patterson has the ability to move the dancers seamlessly in and out of groups and from unison to individual movement.

"Your Provision" was a sensual, ethereal duet for Maggie Small and Fernando Sabino, the most classical of the dancers. Occasionally it seemed that he was a figment of her imagination, sparked by a mysterious book she had been reading at the beginning of the piece; other times, the duet had the quality of a Romeo and Juliet balcony scene. At one moment, the pair knelt, facing upstage, at a low table, as if in marriage. Near the end of the piece, as they walked upstage, she fell into a tremendous backbend, hanging her long, waiflike body over his arm for a second before he righted her.

For the second half of the program, Patterson restaged her sextet "My Witness," commissioned by DanceWorks Chicago last March. Led by Niziol, who created the role in Chicago, and Midgley, the dancers shared the stage with the Chicago folk band Sons of the Never Wrong, whose tunes ranged from quirky to wistful. My favorite section was one for three couples, danced to a song whose lyrics can be summarized as "You're a crazy dude, but I love you anyway." It was a cheeky take on the romantic duet - a genre represented quite a bit in the program, but in ways varied and innovative, current and generally relatable. And that's everything you need in choreography, right there. - Jonelle Seitz



A New Year's Conspirare Classic

St. Martin's Lutheran Church



Whenever we cross into a new year, we tend to focus on 12-month spans: the one just behind us, the one right ahead. But as I listened to Conspirare's first concert of the new year,

I found myself being nudged beyond those immediate turnings of the calendar toward something broader, something grander.

It began the moment the 42 voices of the chorus launched into song: Max Reger's "Der Mensch lebt und bestehet eine kleine Zeit" takes the measure of a man's lifetime and finds it meager beside that of the Almighty. Within that sobering comparison lay the vastness of eternity, the awe-inspiring nature of it underscored by the reverence of Conspirare's delivery. And as the ensemble worked its way through four more of the composer's Acht Geistliche Gesänge (Eight Spiritual Songs), the singers built on our sense of this Being of boundless power and majesty, their hushed wonder at the sacrifice upon the cross occasionally swelling with passion as they smoothly ascended the scales. Reger's 20th century evocation of Bach then gave way to the real thing: Johann Sebastian's "Singet dem Herrn ein neues Lied," a jubilant call for praising God that got the entire choir worked up in a way that I don't recall seeing before. From one end of the ensemble to the other, shoulders were rising and falling and black folders bobbing up and down. The music's joyousness had everyone bouncing as if on springs.

When the songs weren't invoking the Creator, they were invoking his creation and in ways that accentuated its monumental scope. Robert Schumann's "An die Sterne" addressed itself to the "stars in heaven's distant realm," and you could feel their far remove through the singers' voices pitched ethereally high and clustered so tightly as to strike the ears like ringing crystal. The only work of the evening not by a German composer, Samuel Barber's "Sure on This Shining Night," also looked toward those bright wanderers through the infinite, illuminating an Earth where, as James Agee's text has it, "all is healed, all is health." The song's image of a planet at peace, set with that elegiac tenderness so characteristic of Barber, was caressed by the company of

voices in a manner that pierced the heart. Schumann's "Zigeunerleben," vividly describing night in a gypsy camp, and the pieces from Brahms' "Liebeslieder Waltzes," dancing through the various joys and sorrows of love, limned the earthly realm in copious detail - blazing fires, rushing streams, trembling bushes, malicious lime-twigs - which Conspirare attacked with a cheery gusto.

In all the evening, however, there was no greater sense of expansiveness, of opening up to the fullness of creation, than in the "Deutsche Motette," by Richard Strauss. It is built into the work, in the narrator's appeal to the sun and stars to awaken him and in the vocal parts, which divide and divide and divide again, into nearly two dozen parts of dizzying range and staggering complexity. As the choir performed the motet, individual voices would break out of the choral whole like single dreamers rising from the common bed of night, all with the same cry but expressed in beautifully varied ways. The solo voices soared and dipped and wove in and around one another with astounding elegance and then fused together again, as if all those separate dreamers had recognized their shared entreaty and joined hands. It is part of the wonder of Conspirare that it can take works which are so formidable, so exacting, and render them with such grace that their difficulty isn't apparent. With the Strauss, what you were aware of was not how hard the singers were working but how sumptuous and gorgeous and heavenly were their sounds, how they expanded your senses, put you in touch with earth and sky and stars.

Opening us up, connecting us to the greater world - that's what Artistic Director Craig Hella Johnson and Conspirare do and do so well. And they did it here, just as the program's title promised, in "classic" fashion. When I stepped out of St. Martin's Church into a shining night of the new year, the calendar had fallen away, and I was feeling the timeless benediction of the stars and listening to the music of the spheres. - Robert Faires

A Single Man

D: Tom Ford; with Colin Firth, Julianne Moore, Matthew Goode, Nicholas Hoult, Jon Kortajarena, Ginnifer Goodwin, Paulette Lamori. (R, 99 min.)

George Falconer (Firth) is a middle-aged, British ex-pat teaching at university in sunny southern California in 1962. A closeted homosexual by cultural necessity, he's possessed of monumental

outward conformity. Inside, however, beats the heart of a true romantic. He's the sort of fellow who keeps his tastefully decorated moderne home spotless and his reputation even more so. "It takes time in the morning for me to become George," he explains in the first of two voiceovers that bookend the film. "By the time I've dressed and put the final layer of polish on the now slightly stiff but quite perfect George, I know fully what part I'm supposed to play." On the face of it, the immaculately groomed and exceedingly dry George is preparing for yet another day in the classroom – that's his "part" in

dry George is preparing for yet another day in the classroom - that's his "part" in the quotidian SoCal community in which he resides. But beneath that mask of staid conventionality lies the real George, a heartsick shell of a man who has found himself caught in the riptides of grief following the accidental death of his longtime companion Jim (Goode). George has decided to end it all, but it's still only 7am and there's one last day of life for George Falconer to get through. Adapted from the novel by Christopher Isherwood, A Single Man is an exquisite and haunting feature debut from the Austin-born fashion designer/ icon Tom Ford. It's a melancholy meditation on love and death and hidden lives, and Ford brings everything he has to the film, not least of which is his picture-perfect designer's eye for detail, composition, and the infinite subtleties of narrative shading. (Spanish cinematographer Eduard Grau makes the film reflect George's mindset; Los Angeles has rarely looked so desaturated yet so inviting.) A Single Man is, ultimately, Firth's tour de force. He slips into the raw role of George Falconer with exactly as much precision as George brings to becoming Professor Falconer (straight, no chaser), and the masks

both actor and character share are uncom-

monly seamless. Likewise Moore, who shows up as Charley, George's Tanqueray-drowning ex-lover, closest friend, and only confidante. Their scenes together – they get trashed and dance around her place, then fall to the white shag, panting, smoking, and blearily confessing to each other like a pair of well-heeled high school kids – have the cleareyed sheen of those left behind, booze or no booze. When, late in the last night of his life, George runs into one of his students, the impetuous and alluring Kenny (Hoult, best remembered looking considerably younger

in About a Boy) both Firth and Ford seize on George's equally fervid and presumably final grab at life and love (of a sort), and the sequence, which ends up in the inky midnight of the Pacific Ocean, has a magical grace to it. Few directors, much less big-screen

neophytes, have conjured the ability to distill the human byproducts of love and death with such ethereal, elegiac style as Ford does here. Fittingly, Alfred Hitchcock, who did just that while driving Jimmy Stewart to madness over Kim Novak in Vertigo, is referenced all over the place, from Abel Korzeniowski's Bernard Herrmann-esque score to an instantclassic shot that imposes Firth against a massive, piercingly blue image of Janet Leigh's eyes on an outdoor advert for Psycho. A Single Man is an absurdly ravishing piece of filmmaking. It's not simply that Ford has a ravening and righteous eye for cinematic composition and detail (you'd expect that from the Gucci resurrectionist and onetime guest editor of Vanity Fair); it's that everything fits perfectly, from titles to fin, but most of all Firth, who dons the role of George like a fine bespoke suit. Which, Ford being Ford, - Marc Savlov it surely was.

THE LOVELY BONES D: Peter Jackson; with Saoirse Ronan, Mark Wahlberg, Rachel Weisz, Susan Sarandon, Stanley Tucci, Michael Imperioli, Rose McIver, Reece Ritchie, Carolyn Dando. (PG-13, 135 min.)

After helming The Lord of the Rings film trilogy, Jackson will forever be associated with Middle-earth. The filmmaker has moved on but, apparently, not so his interest in fictional worlds. There are no elves or wizards or hobbits in The Lovely Bones, no battles for world domination or one ring to rule them all. The alternate world in this film, which is based on the bestseller by Alice Sebold, is the netherworld - the place between life and death. Earth and heaven, the place where souls linger when they are not yet ready to part from life. The storyline is horrifyingly disturbing and by all rights should be a heartstrings-tugger: In 1973, a 14-yearold girl is murdered by a serial killer, and although her body is never recovered, her corporeal presence lingers in the in-between world observing her family. A story about the unbreakable bonds between parents and children, a story about thwarted justice and monstrous revelations is diverted by Jackson into a story about the CGI wow factor of his netherworld. Colors are drenched and cornfields undulate provocatively despite their swampy firmament, tree leaves fall away only to take flight as birds, the horizon is indeed eternal, and the landscape can be stark and foreboding or candy-colored and popdrenched. Jackson appears to have devoted all his energies into creating these alternaworld images but, sadly, when you get right down to them, his images are fairly prosaic and commonplace. His attention to the post-mortem wanderings of Susie Salmon (Ronan) caused Jackson to short-shrift his surviving characters, which is a shame because their performances are all very good yet fail to connect emotionally with the audience. How the devastating story of the senseless murder of a 14-year-old could be

stripped of emotion is a feat in itself, though one of dubious achievement. Wahlberg delivers some of his best work as Susie's everfaithful dad, and mom Weisz is at her most compliant and integrative. Ronan, as she demonstrated in Atonement, is one of the most accomplished young actors of today. Tucci, who never fails to impress, shows his range this year by playing both The Lovely Bones' nebbishy murderer and Julia Child's love-besotted husband in Julie & Julia, while Imperioli grows out his sideburns to play the supportive detective on the case. Sarandon, however, as the hip, boozing grandma, gets the short end of the stick by having her performance, though delightful in itself, serve as the film's comic relief. It grates all the more, because without experiencing the deep emotions and tensions one might expect from this story, there is no need for comic relief. Why Susie would want to stick around with these deadbeats is the movie's only real mystery. ZOMBIE GIRL: THE MOVIE D: Aaron Marshall, Justin Johnson. Erik Mauck. (NR. 91 min.)

Ostensibly, we already know the story of this documentary and the trajectory it will take. Zombie Girl: The Movie records the experiences of Austin resident Emily Hagins who, in 2005 at the age of 12, made her first feature film, a zombie picture titled Pathogen. It's an inspirational story, of course, and also an illustrative tale for would-be filmmakers of any age. Emily wrote the script when she was 10, and once production starts, she also becomes the film's producer, director, camera operator, casting director, and editor. Plus, she performs all these tasks while three cameramen whirl about her making their own documentary about this atypical filmmaker and her project. The history of how Emily arrived at the point of making her own movie is recounted in Zombie Girl: The Movie (and previous stories here in the Chronicle and elsewhere) so I won't repeat it now. Suffice it to say that Emily's saga has made her the crown princess of all geekdom, and this documentary about her budding career was fittingly rewarded with the Spirit of Slamdance Award when it debuted at that festival in 2009. However, if that's all there were to this documentary there would be nothing to distinguish Zombie Girl:

The Movie from the million other documentaries out there about single-minded visionaries who move heaven and Earth to accomplish their dreams. No, this is also a story about modern-day parenting, and the lessons the film has to teach us on the subject are just as illuminating as those about filmmaking strategies. Emily receives phenomenal support from parents who appear thrilled by the prospect of having raised an artist. Megan and Jerry Hagins support their only child with their time, money, and physical labor. Megan is not only constantly present at the end of the long pole holding a jury-rigged boom mike, she is also a visual artist who serves as the film's co-producer, prop master, effects designer, caterer, and transportation coordinator who chauffeurs all the nondriving kid cast members and crew to and from the set. Unlike her daughter, who can work on school holidays and summer vacation, Megan takes days off from her job to help. Dad, Jerry, is a banjo player who is also very involved. As parents, they are caught between realizing that their daughter is both exceptional yet also a typical 12-year-old who doesn't always think things through, plan strategically, see the big picture, or have a reserve of patience. Megan, who is at Emily's side throughout the making of Pathogen, tries to guide her daughter's impulses the way other moms and daughters tussle over haircuts and skirt lengths. The reviewers who have described Megan as a meddler are way off-base. The Hagins are pure enablers, helping their child to focus her vision while also realizing that their girl's needs have begun to outstrip their own pool of knowledge. The documentary's three co-directors are smart to privilege the mother-daughter aspect of the story, a focus that lends their film universal appeal. They also gathered plenty of firstperson interviews so that the subjects can tell the story on their own without any scripted voiceover. Cute interstitials break the story into more understandable time interludes, while a sequence in which various speakers reflect on the revolution that is yet to be created by this first generation of fully digital filmmakers is totally on point. To wit: Emily Hagins is currently working on her third feature. (Screens Sunday-Wednesday - Marjorie Baumgarten only.)

ALVIN AND THE CHIPMUNKS: THE SQUEAKQUEL D: Betty Thomas; with Zachary Levi, David Cross, Jason Lee, Wendie Malick; with the voices of Justin Long, Matthew Gray Gubler, Jesse McCartney, Anna Faris, Christina Applegate, Amy Poehler. (PG, 88 min.)

It's a rare but not unheard-of event for a sequel to top its predecessor. This is not one of those sequels, however, and director Thomas, working from a script by returning screenwriter Jon Vitti and Kung Fu Panda scribe Jonathan Aibel, does little to improve on 2007's original "film/rebranding event." While The Squeakquel might be appreciated by filmgoers ages 10 or younger, the rest of us should be investing heavily in d-CON and working feverishly through the night to build a better rodent trap. This time out, the all-singing, all-dancing, all-CGI chipmunks – rebel with paws Alvin (Long), wise guy Simon (Gubler), and tubby emo vermin Theodore (McCartney) – wind up in a contrived "squeak-off" with a new trio of singing

female chipmunks, cruelly dubbed the "Chipettes" by down-on-his-luck record exec Ian Hawk (Cross, returning from the original in search of a paycheck and not much else). Muskrat love, of a sort, is in the air. (12/25/2009) – Marc Savlov

Osamu Tezuka's pioneering Japanese manga and animé series about the coolest robot kid ever finally achieves Americanized big-screen status. Although something has been lost in the translation, this Astro Boy remains true to the heart and soul of the original. Screenwriter Timothy Harris comes up with a few new twists on Tezuka's original - most notably the nascent romance between Astro and plucky surface-dweller Cora (Bell) - and this Astro Bov moves along at least as snappily as its rocket-powered protagonist. But ultimately, Bowers' take on the animé legend feels too indebted to the far superior The Iron Giant and overstreamlined in both story and animation. It's a totally serviceable reboot for young people who are just discovering the joys of manga, but I can't help but miss the raw animation and even rawer emotional aesthetics of the original televised animé series. AVATAR D: James Cameron; with Sam Worthington, Zoe Saldana, Sigourney Weaver, Stephen Lang, Michelle Rodriguez, Giovanni Ribisi. (PG-13, 162 min.)

At 162 minutes and a cost of somewhere between \$250 million and \$300 million, Cameron's ne plus ultra of futuristic mechanized mayhem and seamless CGI trickery is both a cinematically spectacular slab of virtually nonstop action and an unmistakable diatribe against corporatized American imperialism. There are the usual muscled-up boys (and equally powerful girls) with big-bang toys, crying havoc and letting slip the dogs of war, to be sure, but at its heart this mammoth film is ... a chick flick. Despite a script that at times leaves its most interesting characters delivering some of the most banal lines in a Cameron film thus far, somehow it all holds together. As a purely visual experience, it's like nothing you've ever seen before: a lush, sexy, primal world created entirely by Cameron's legions of CGI masters. Avatar is thrilling, lovely, sad, and explosive in all the right ways. THE BLIND SIDE D: John Lee Hancock; with Sandra Bullock, Quinton Aaron, Tim McGraw, Kathy Bates, Jae Head, Lily Collins, Ray McKinnon, Kim Dickens. (PG-13, 126 min.)

Writer/director Hancock (The Rookie) overcomes most of the built-in problems inherent to inspirational sports dramas. Also in the film's plus column are two standout performances: Aaron, as the sweet-mannered but largely uncom municative football player Michael (Aaron does some very subtle body work, using the way he carries his heft as an emotional signpost), and Bullock, as the prickly, straight-talking Memphis socialite who welcomes Michael into her home and eventually makes him a part of the family. This is a dream role for Bullock - finally, a job that requires her to be adult, tart, and smart, all at once - and she makes good use of it. It's not an altogether convincing portrait, but it is an entertaining, even moving one, and the forcefulness of her presence goes a long way in pulling the film back from the brink of cuddliness. Director Duffy's wickedly bloodthirsty and strangely humorous The Boondock Saints was a cult hit waiting to happen that somehow didn't. As a post-post-Tarantino hipster-shoot-'em-up, it seemed oddly dated back when it received a microrelease from Miramax before heading straight to video and developing a substantial following, in part due to the canny documentary Overnight, which chronicles the Boondock director's meteoric nonrise to and ego-fueled fall from indie cinema heaven. The original is all muzzle flash and zero smarts, but its loopy storyline, which has hard-drinking, harder-fighting Boston-Irish sibling vigilantes Connor and Murphy MacManus (Flanery and Reedus) laying waste to both the Italian and Russian mobs in modern-day Beantown, is delirious, brutish, testosteronefueled un-fun. All Saints Day, from its dullish title on down to its final bullet, is the sort of outrageously bad filmmaking that defines the phrase "unnecessary sequel." Even fans of these bloodsoaked bouncing Murphys might think twice before giving the downward-spiraling director a third chance. (12/04/2009) - Marc Saylov

Ever the lush and melodramatic filmmaker, Almodóvar appears to be adding a bit of narrative suspense to his storytelling in Broken Embraces. Starring his longtime muse Cruz, the film is about mad love and its consequences, but Broken Embraces is as much about the art of filmmaking as anything else. It takes place in the past and the present and features characters who assume different names as the story progresses. Although it's not particularly hard to follow, the story is convoluted, and the visuals are rich, color-drenched, and intricate. Broken Embraces is also thematically layered. At times, it looks as though the film might be the love child of Douglas Sirk and Alfred Hitchcock, with its dramatic broad strokes, iconic reds, and teasing narrative clues. In the third act, events pile on at an excessive rate and the subplots also come into greater play. The experience can be heady and delirium-provoking, but hey, that's cinema for you. - Marjorie Baumgarten

Maguire plays the elder Cahill brother, Sam, a captain in the Marines; an attentive husband to his high school sweetheart, Grace (Portman): and a devoted father to two little girls. Brothers, in its most effective and engrossing stretches, examines the malleability of the roles the various Cahills are assigned, either by themselves or by others. All the actors do well enough, but they don't mesh at all - it's as if everyone's acting in his or her own movie - and there's simply no livedin quality to the film. Sheridan and scripter David Benioff stick closely to the bullet points of the original but can't seem to translate the rich complexity of the characters and the choices they make. Intelligence is insulted at every turn in this date movie from former "swingers" Vaughn and Favreau, who now write themselves roles as middle-aged men grown flabby in both body and spirit. Vaughn also produces and, as the film's top-lined star, plays the only happily married man in this story's quartet of couples who attend a weeklong couples retreat. Random sequences follow in succession: a badly choreographed shark attack, a massage that requires a self-serve happy ending, ridiculous therapy sessions, a Fabio look-alike yoga instructor (Ponce) who provides the requisite homophobic sight gags, and a renegade excursion to the singles' side of the resort where, magically, everything resolves. Logic and credibility are defied at almost every opportunity. Even so, some

That's due almost entirely to Bridges' searing and sorrowful turn as the alcohol-basted and nicotine-stained C&W has-been Bad Blake. It's a performance that's magnificent in its road-weariness, and it's a measure of just how truly great an actor Bridges has matured into over the years. Backed (and haunted) by a blazingly fine soundtrack courtesy of T Bone Burnett and the late Stephen Bruton and a theme song (and screen appearance) by rising star Ryan Bingham, Bridges makes this sozzled and desperate ex-desperado - a cliché by any other name - as fresh and vital as one final shot at cowboy-poet redemption. When a small enclave of human resistance rightly senses Dalton is a sympathizer, he goes off the grid to help manufacture a cure to vampirism. It's a little bit silly – as is Dafoe's Kentucky-fried cowboy mechanic named Elvis - but silly is fun. 

THE IMAGINARIUM OF DOCTOR PARNASSUS D: Terry Gilliam: with Heath Ledger.

Christopher Plummer. Tom Waits. Lily Cole. Andrew Garfield. Verne Troyer, Johnny Depp, Colin Farrell, Jude Law. (PG-13, 122 min.)

Christopher Plummer is delightful as this movie's master magician and impresario of the rickety Imaginarium, a traveling road show that features a mirrorlike portal into one's unconscious, but the real Parnassus here is Gilliam. In what has almost become his signature m.o., Gilliam rescues his film from the jaws of disaster - this time when his star Heath Ledger died abruptly midway through filming. Concocting a scenario that almost works seamlessly, three actors - Depp, Farrell, and Law - were enlisted to play different aspects of Tony, the name of Ledger's character who entices people to part with their money and trip through the Imaginarium. This "continuity snafu" is not what undermines The Imaginarium of Doctor Parnassus. Instead, the problem resides with the story itself, or rather, the lack of story. Co-written with Charles McKeown, with whom Gilliam also wrote Brazil and The Adventures of Baron Munchausen, the scenario doesn't contain much activity beyond the initial setup. Freeman teams up once again with director Fastwood to play South African president and international hero Nelson Mandela. The story is based on John Carlin's book Playing the Enemy: Nelson Mandela and the Game That Made a Nation. The game in question is rugby, and the events surround Mandela's enthusiastic support of the South African team's attempt to win the 1995 Rugby World Cup. Although a fan of the sport, Mandela's actions were born of an ulterior motive: that of building a post-apartheid nation. With racial tensions high after his release from prison and ascension to the presidency, Mandela saw a means of bridging the fears between his newly powerful black constituency and the fearful, white old guard. Eastwood's direction, though typically assured and understated, is nevertheless flabby at times. IT'S COMPLICATED D: Nancy Meyers: with Meryl Streep, Alec Baldwin, Steve Martin, John Krasinski, Lake Bell, Caitlin Fitzgerald, Zoe Kazan, Hunter Parrish. (R, 118 min.)

The thing about It's Complicated is that it's not ... complicated. Writer-director Meyers has come to specialize in making wish-fulfillment fantasies for middle-aged women in which smart, professional, single, Caucasian women of a certain age have wonderful careers, picture-perfect homes, and love affairs aplenty. In It's Complicated, Streep plays Jane Adler, a Santa Barbara, Calif., restaurateur who is 10 years divorced from Jake (Baldwin) when they begin having an affair. Also present in Jane's life is Adam (Martin), the architect who is overseeing the planned expansion of her already perfect home. Many are the amusing and knowing moments in this comedy, yet the fabric of Meyers' fantasy is too gossamer to sustain the weight

Leap Year is a desperately unfunny depiction of a Boston society-girl wannabe who, blanching and distressed in the face of yet another nonproposal from her cardiologist beau (Scott), secretly follows the ungroom in question to Ye Auld Eire with plans to ensnare him on the titular date (according some arcane leprechaunic lore, it's doable in Dublin). Anna (Adams) is coiffed and costumed to resemble an uptown cross between The Quiet Man-era Maureen O'Hara and vintage Nicole Kidman, but the character is ill-flavored with a sort of ugly-American perkiness that sets your nerves on edge and makes you wonder in all seriousness if Tucker isn't employing some sort of wickedly dry, highly unsubtle cultural critique on both the U.S. and Ireland. Leap Year is a perfect template for romcom mediocrity, from its cookie-cutter script to the stupendously absent electricity between Adams and her coy Irish rover boy (Goode). But the "hardest working man in show business" kept the date, dedicated the show to King, and electrified the audience. THE MEN WHO STARE AT GOATS

D: Grant Heslov; with George Clooney, Ewan McGregor, Jeff Bridges, Kevin Spacey, Stephen Lang, Robert Patrick, Waleed Zuaiter, Stephen Root. (R. 93 min.)

All goats aside, this is one odd duck. A title card "More of this is true than you would believe," but it's impossible to tell what's factual in this fictionalized take on Jon Ronson's book about Army experiments in the paranormal because it all sounds so deeply ludicrous. It's never uninteresting - but never entirely successful, either. Reeling from his wife's infidelity, journalist Bob Wilton (McGregor) leaves his podunk paper in Ann Arbor, Mich., for Iraq, and bumps into the story of a lifetime, packaged neatly in the mustachioed frame of Clooney's Lyn Cassady, psychic spy. This is Heslov's first time directing, after co-writing and producing with Clooney Good Night, and Good Luck., and there are too many tiny blunders to call his debut a triumph. Still, there is Clooney's deceptively layered performance, some startling bits of laugh-out-loud absurdity, and the not-at-all-negligible pleasure to be had in a cockeyed point of view. It's a bold move to film a musical with cast members who, apart from Fergie and Cotillard, are not known to possess any singing or dancing skills. Each musical number gives the appearance of having been doctored to within an inch of its life with crazy pans, cuts, differing film stocks, jewelbedecked costumes, and eye-catching movements constantly graphing our focus. Day-Lewis also performs and dances two numbers obligingly, but the chinks in this great actor's performance arsenal show. Also, much of the film's music is instantly forgettable. Pitched somewhere between a preadolescent boy's fantasy world of nunchaku and shuriken (or fighting sticks and throwing stars) and a wildly off-kilter exercise in homoerotic beefcakery, this astonishingly crappy slo-mo gorefest proves once and for all that McTeigue wasn't the man responsible for the excellent V for Vendetta and that the writer/ producer Wachowski brothers were. I'm not sure there's anybody at the helm of Ninia Assassin, which just flat-out sucks rice dumplings, beginning with its generic title on down to its preposterously dumb view of the ups and downs and, you know, bulletavoidance techniques of your average contemporary ninja. That would be ginchy Korean pop-lite star Rain who plays Raizo, abducted as a child by the not even vaguely mysterious Ozuno Clan, and thereafter raised to be, like, totally unkillable and way superbuff. The convoluted and really, really lousy storyline has sexy Interpol agent Mika Coretti (Harris) digging up connections between international assassinations and the Ozunus. Planet 51 is innocuous to the point of distraction. While the CG animation is colorful and vibrant, the story is little more than a compilation of sciencefiction clichés. Planet 51's main gag is the reversal of the ancient (by Hollywood standards, anyway) genre convention of society's fear of alien invasion. Here, it's the green-skinned, droopily antennaed aliens who are terrified of a lone human spaceman (Johnson), who crash-lands into their world. In a sop to Hollywood's golden age of science-fiction filmmaking, the whole

planet closely parallels Fifties Americana, right down to the Happy Days slang and the monster-movie matinees playing at the local movie theatre. I could go on and on about Planet 51's multitude of direct references to its sci-fi antecendents, but the bottom line is that Planet 51, while expertly executed animationwise and passably entertaining for very young kids (less so for their parents), is still as dull as the hull on Rocketship X-M. PRECIOUS: BASED ON THE NOVEL 'PUSH' BY SAPPHIRE

Much like its title protagonist Precious - a sexually, emotionally, and physically abused 16-year-old African-American girl who is functionally illiterate, morbidly obese, and pregnant with her second child fathered by her own father - this film is a roughhewn entity with unlikely odds for success. Yet both the character and the movie overcome their handicaps to become the kind of success stories that the American mythmaking machinery loves to love. Claireece Precious Jones (Sidibe) and her mother, Mary (Mo'Nique), are women we rarely notice. But instead of looking the other way, this movie and the popular book on which it is based place them front and center. Newcomer Sidibe is a real find and not just a looming presence and narrative device. Daniels has also done a marvelous job of casting famous friends of his and getting heart-stirring, strippeddown performances from them all. Catherine Hardwicke started the saga with last year's Twilight, a deliciously trashy mash of pulp and pop art that managed to take seriously its central lovers – doomy vampire Edward (Pattinson) and his teenage human paramour, Bella (Stewart) - while maintaining a sense of humor about itself. But Summit Entertainment chucked Hardwicke for the second installment, and her successor, Weitz, brings zero sense of play or sexual energy to the piece. It's as if everything's been buffed to achieve maximum banality. At the film's beginning, Edward dumps Bella - like, the day after her birthday, OMG - and is mostly absent in New Moon, which turns out to be a boon. Bella, incapacitated with grief, turns to her old pal Jacob (Lautner), but then Jacob starts morphing into a werewolf. The digital effects here are top-notch (as were the ones Weitz supervised in his last film, The Golden Compass), and New Moon excels in two centerpiece action sequences. Life is simple in Emmerich's films. Confronted with unprecedented perils, the characters in his disaster epics manage to reaffirm their broken loves, make amends for slipshod parenting, and, most impressively, outrun fireballs and certain death with their hides and wits intact. Emmerich takes the disaster-movie genre to its logical conclusion in 2012, obliterating or reconfiguring vast swaths of the planet's surface (solar storms boil the Earth's core; tectonic havoc ensues) and providing a 158-minute thrill ride that zips by like the real thing. Over the duration, there are homages (or lifts) to apocalyptic exercises of decades past (particularly When Worlds Collide) and plenty of cheeky references to Emmerich's own résumé. 2012 is PTSD —

Popcorn Thrills and Sappy meloDrama – supersized to counter current real-world terrors, and it is, by turns, thrilling, ridiculous (the script, by Emmerich and longtime co-writer Harald Kloser, is riddled with howlingly goofy lines and seriously improbable deusex-machina moments), and just plain big, dumb fun. UP IN THE AIR D: Jason Reitman; with George Clooney, Vera Farmiga, Anna Kendrick, Jason Bateman, Amy Morton, Melanie Lynskey, J.K. Simmons, Sam Elliott, Danny McBride. (R, 109 min.)

Either by design or default, Reitman has customed a film perfectly in tune with these economically distressed, tetchy times, which may explain the near-universal hosannas with which Up in the Air has been met. Reitman sets the film in motion with an opening-credit sequence that highlights how America's vistas look from up above - apropros, considering that's where "career transition counselor" Ryan Bingham (Clooney) spends most of his time. Bingham, by choice, is a man without country or close ties, but very quickly two women (Farmiga and Kendrick) arrive in his life to shake up the status quo. Reitman's instincts, of both timing and tone, can feel just a hair off in the film's imperfect first and third acts. But the middle is terrific, especially in a lengthy, unassuming scene in which the three leads sit, sip drinks, and have a good chat: It marks one of the great celluloid pleasures of the year, so virtuosically written, performed, and filmed is it. WHERE THE WILD

THINGS ARE D: Spike Jonze; with Max Records, Catherine Keener, Mark Ruffalo, Pepita Emmerichs, Steve Mouzakis; with the voices of James Gandolfini, Lauren Ambrose, Paul Dano. Catherine O'Hara. Chris Cooper. Forest Whitaker. (PG. 94 min.)

This is a freewheeling but tonally and aesthetically true adaptation of Maurice Sendak's 1963 children's book. Jonze, in collaboration with co-screenwriter Dave Eggers, seems to have tapped every primal feeling along the spectrum - joy, grief, rage, a relish for mayhem – and put it onscreen for our viewing pleasure. And a pleasure it is - the rare children's film that isn't coded for adults or made corny and flip for kids. Working with Jim Henson's Creature Shop and adapting quite literally Sendak's original etchings, Jonze has put to film what generations of children have only dreamed about: the nearness and dearness of Sendak's woolly beasts. One of the many delights of the film is in how physical it is (somebody is always pummeling somebody else and then following the beating with a bruising bear hug). There are minor grievances with the film, all technical, but they frankly feel inconsequential when put next to the film's overall effect. (10/16/2009) - Kimberley Jones Movies 8

THE YOUNG VICTORIA

How young is young Victoria? At the film's beginning, she's just 17, with all the sullenness you would expect from a shut-in future queen fending off attack from her maman and prospective suitors cherry-picked by two kings. Blunt convincingly portrays the Princess Victoria as bullied and slightly silly but, most of all, desperately alone. Scriptwriter Julian Fellowes makes admirable work of shorthanding the complicated lineages and motives and manueverings. Director Vallée leans on candelight for several key scenes, and the effect is not only gorgeous but also intimates the deepening attachment between Victoria and Albert - one that was mutually felt but not spoken about plainly. (Having just earned her independence, Victoria isn't keen on giving it up again so soon.) All told, The Young Victoria is a very well-made if not especially memorable picture, moving with all the grace and steadfastness of a waltz Victoria and Albert share, but absent any urgency or anything particularly exclamatory. Taken from C.D. Payne's early Nineties epistolary novel, Youth in Revolt chronicles the tortured life of Nick Twisp (Cera), a teen living mostly friendlessly in Oakland, Calif. Nick's life takes a turn for the better, however, when a family outing to a trailer park puts him in the path of Sheeni Saunders (Doubleday), She's sharp, educated, and cool to touch, at home in bikinis and Fifties shirtdresses. She drives Nick wild. Cera is fine here, and his range broadens some when Nick invents an alter ego named François - chain-smoking, troublemaking - because, as Nick puts it, "my one and only love wants me to be bad," Gustin Nash's script consistently delivers on situational laughs, even if he never shades in the characters beyond mere pencil sketch. And given the edgy bent of director Arteta's stand-out earlier work (The Good Girl, Chuck & Buck), there's a surprising lack of bite to - Kimberley Jones the film. "Every artist had someone else who came before them, that influenced them and made them want to do what they do. J Dilla was that artist for me."

Born in Detroit and raised on the Dilla-produced Slum Village albums that have become synonymous with Hitsville USA's hip-hop sound, producer/MC Black Milk, born Curtis Cross, wears the comparisons like a badge of honor.

"It's a compliment when people compare me to him and think I can get close to the level of music he's on," Milk admits. "I definitely don't shy away from it. He was the person to make me even want to start making beats. A lot of my earlier beats sounded just like Dilla's music, too. As time's gone on and I've learned more about music theory, music production, I've learned to create my own lane."

Milk's first ride in that lane came on 2008's Tronic, which found

him dabbling in live instrumentation and veering from the hard drums and Detroit swing of 2007's Popular Demand. His upcoming Album of the Year intends to take things a step further. Milk's been working closely with drummer Daru James, part of Milk's live act, and Detroit trumpeter Sam Beaubien's funk band the Will Sessions to create what he calls a "more organic sound than I've ever made before."

"The album will definitely have more of a live feel than anything I've done before, even Tronic. I don't want people to be scared. I know the risks you take when you incorporate live music into hip-hop. I made sure to keep that 'oomph' coming through the - Chase Hoffberger speakers."

HAUNTING OBOE MUSIC

Hole in the Wall, Friday 15

The music of Austin's pop genrespanners neither featured an oboe nor was especially haunting, but it made great use of the quiet-loud formula. 
Saturday night playlist at Elysium. It's cool. This isn't the rust belt; it's idea city. Amazingly, out-of-town venture capitalists, rich retirees, and fun-loving rubes of all types have bought into the idea of Austin like few other has something to do with Austin's incessant shitstorm of hype: Austin is creative.

Austin is open-minded. Austin is fun. Austin is friendly. Austin is entertaining. Whether motivated by cunning self-interest or monumental hubris, we Austinites have been pimping our city with evangelical fervor for decades – so much so that people in other parts of the state and country are now doing it for us, gratis. Mission accomplished. Austin is truly one bangin' burg. The big question now is whether or not the people buying into all those shiny new buildings will buy into the Austin aesthetic as well. Will they go out and get their nails dirty in the grungier side of Austin culture, or will they stick to the places that are cleaner, less cluttered, and culturally homogeneous? If anything, the Austin aesthetic is constantly being redefined, both in a physical sense by the type of businesses that are able to thrive in such a quickly changing cultural environment and by the people who contribute to that culture. Ultimately a lot of the funkiness (whether organic or contrived) of Downtown Austin has been squeezed out into less dense and less expensive areas not within an easy walk of highrise residents. Those fun-loving condo buyers are slowly being hemmed in by the types of businesses and culture they were presumably trying to escape. Maybe it's no big deal. Austin is still an excellent place for the rich to go slumming, if only for the fact that Central Austin has very few slums, just areas filled with middle-class suburban expatriates that look slummy. How's that for a win-win? If you're one of those fun-loving condo dwellers looking to do a little slumming this weekend, try ColdTowne Theater this Saturday for Stool Pigeon, a series of improv comedy sketches based on the stories of local guest celebs, in this case Geeks Who Drink quiz queen Becca Peterson and Charlie Hodge, the quick-witted quarterback of KLBJ's Charlie Hodge Rock 'n' Roll Half-Time Show.
