
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## **Before the Impending Flood**

An erratic list of memories and some dates

#### Only Six Weeks Until SXSW 2010:

"Low down leaving sun, I've done Done, did everything that needs done Woe is me, why can't I see? I'd best be leaving well enough alone"

I talk too much and don't listen enough. Pledging my allegiance to silence without really looking for or wanting it. Dreaming of the past while looking toward the future. The temporal present is too capricious, binding, and stagnant. This column covers traveling through many different states, in no particular chronological order. It's a column about driving.

#### Texas, Jan. 26, 2010:

Early last Tuesday, I listened to the radio while driving around town. The big bass voice on it was clearly deeply in love with its own sounds and absolutely impressed by its own expression of thoughts. Strutting ego-first, chin-forward, having run itself up the flagpole to be saluted, the voice waited for the wind. I couldn't tell if it was Limbaugh or local. I turned the radio off.

In the evening, I watched the cable news that makes me crazy (Fox) and the news that makes me less crazy (MSNBC). I knew I had to take a break from watching the news and listening to the radio -

which I have done, not just for the rest of that night but ever since then. I'm too much of an addict not to return. But for now I'm on the wagon, trying not to fall off, only to be crushed beneath its wheels.

Politics has always seemed like human theatre, stretched and strained through fun-house mirrors. Some poetry, even great poetry, has always seemed like gossip well-told. The TV news has always seemed distorted because it is distorted - because it is what it is. In a world where there is Fox News and MSNBC, where there is conspiracy radio, right-wing talk radio, and abstract, radicalized, political ranting on access shows, the meaning of the offerings is neither universal nor in any way objective. Stacked with words that are loaded with meaning, the most important part of many news programs is not what is seen on the screen but what happens in viewers' heads.

In many ways, modern news media - from giant entities in thrall to dominant ideology to the Web to revolutionary communist publications - having been freed from linear, sequential reasoning and Gutenberg-centric logic, are postprint and post-literate.

Finally, the most abstract philosophizing of such great French semiotic theoreticians as Roland Barthes and Christian Metz have been vetted into three, if not four, dimensions. Even on those rare occasions when modern news programming seems anchored in the more traditional ways of making meaning, it is not. What seem to be closed texts, as those are traditionally conceived, are actually wide open. They are made of readerly text, wrapped in the sheep's clothing of the writerly: Each viewer authors his or her own news out of and reinforcing personal reality.

#### New Orleans, La., 2009:

She had this dream the night before she called. This was not a recurrent dream, for this was the only time she dreamed this dream. In the dream she was telling the new tall skinny guy with a growth of beard her dream. She had been walking down the

hall carrying folders. But the hall was stretching on and

on forever.

#### Austin, Texas, 2010:

I refuse to hate. I do not know. I will not argue politics today. I will stand in the rain singing ancient rain songs. I don't know how I know them. All I'm trying to do is not pay attention. I will mumble

to myself. Sleep is the best avoidance, but when I can't sleep, I find myself slowly drenched by an evening mist that coats me with anxiety.

#### Montreal, 1973:

We drove up from Boston to Montreal. Coming too close to the sun, I had singed the wings of dreams. Nearly mad, I walked the streets of Montreal for hours, muttering poetry to myself. Being holy because of her, it was not only the very worst of my days until then, but also it was damned.

#### Austin, Texas, September 1981:

The first issue of The Austin Chronicle is published.

#### New Jersey, 1952-1975:

The very core of who I am is defined and crafted by my religious beliefs. Everything I've ever done of any worth was informed by their principles, as well as the moral and ethical guidelines, based on spiritual thought, taught to me by my parents. I hope one day that my son will say the same.

#### Lake Arthur, La., 1991:

Fred and I are visiting some friends who are shooting a film around Lake Arthur and Jennings, La. During the day, while they are shooting, Fred and I drive around Louisiana in a rented car, eating Cajun and creole food, listening to the radio, and arguing metaphysics. (Okay, maybe not arguing metaphysics.) Our last morning there, our friend whips up a monster breakfast of eggs, sausage, bacon, pancakes, and biscuits. While everyone eats and talks, her partner stands by the sink eating his way through a big tub of crawfish left over from the night before. We leave, I did not see him do so but have no doubt he finished the whole tub.

#### Vermont, 1973:


#### Maine, South Carolina, Florida, Vermont, 1972-1975:

Every time, every day, every dream, every morning there was a heavy dew, whether coating New England grass or soaking rows of cotton to the point that it looked like toilet paper hanging on the bushes. In the beginning: SXSW '87, the first one! The phone rings at 6am. After answering it and talking, I go back to sleep.

#### Boston, 1974:

Politics has polluted my sleep. Still, I sleep all the time, as the pollution is not that bad. I'm trying to remember the sudden rain that day in Boston. It poured, soaking us as we walked back to our apartment laughing. Still laughing, soon you were on the phone trying to find a train going south. We both knew that hitchhiking was certainly not going to work in that downpour.

#### Vermont, End of the Summer, 1974:

The day we left Vermont, I checked the box of booze we had brought to the house at the beginning of the summer. It was all gone. Not a drop was left. I lost at croquet the night before we left. I always lost. She cheated that night, just as she always cheated, but she also lost.

#### Texas, 2010:

There are those who know. They quite simply and completely know. They know good from evil, right from wrong, and they know the truth. Unlike them, I know nothing for certain. Unlike them, I have no truth. Unlike so many, I have been drowning. But I do not mind. Unlike me, I love the rain.

#### Texas, New Jersey, California, 2003:

Today (but not really today, instead six years ago), he became a man. We welcomed him as a man into the community of adults, but being so welcomed is only a beginning. The chapters on childhood are finished; new ones begin. Being of the community, it must be acknowledged, will involve not just achievements but failures, not just strengths but weaknesses, not just acts of learning and generosity but those of ignorance and selfishness. Such is how it is to be among the adults.

#### Florida, 1973:

Standing by the Peace River, in the backyard of our house. The newspaper reporter recites Vachel Lindsay. I listen. I'm reading Larry McMurtry.

#### Texas, 2010:

I was driving, but it was not raining. I was thinking of this painter in Chicago. Not really of her but of her work. It was easy to do so. I had vanquished romance, banishing it from my life. I think of a songwriter who left Chicago. In

an attic in a three-story house on a dead-end street, he organized the Louis Black Grudge Band, which only did Stones covers. It may still be there.

There is another songwriter, this one stuck in Chicago. I'm sure he is smiling.

Although I've known him long, I don't know him well, but I'm sure he is. I'm probably wrong.

## University of California at Santa Cruz, 2009\*:

Visiting my son at college. My heart is bursting with a great love. But such is the way it has been every day of his life since he was born. Through every circumstance, whether good or bad. Every chance, whether he tried too hard or squandered opportunities, whether he succeeded or didn't.

An early statement addressed to him:

"To say I trust you on this voyage is a gross understatement. Already, when the occasion has demanded it, since you could talk, you have been as skilled and tenacious as any trial lawyer and as pugnacious and absolute as any moral philosopher. At the drop of a thought, you are ready to argue any issue, split any hair to prove your point the correct one. 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#### LET'S CHOOSE CIVILIZATION

Dear Editor.

Thanks for the article "Can't Get There From Here" [News, Jan. 22]. It highlights Austin's worst transportation problem - failure to address the basics, such as sidewalks and bus stops, before building zoomways and parking lots for cars.

As Lee Nichols points out, the sad state of Austin's bus system is not Capital Metro's fault alone. A big chunk of the problem is a lack of sidewalks. A civilized city needs good sidewalks on both sides of every street. Without this, bus and train systems do not work well. Without continuous sidewalks, car owners will not choose to walk. Bicyclists have nowhere to go when the bike gets a flat or the street is jammed with idling cars. Old people, children, people with disabilities, and people who like to walk are just out of luck. It's so sad to read of Austin's grand transportation schemes that leave out the sidewalk system.

Unlike many of Austin's deficiencies, the lack of sidewalk is easy to fix. People already know how to build sidewalks. We don't need a traffic study to

build sidewalks. Austin even has a Sidewalk Plan. There's an inventory of existing and missing sidewalks. There's a system for deciding which sidewalks to build first. But there is no reasonable timetable, no funding schedule that would finish the sidewalks within, say, 20 years. At present rates of construction, it will take 200 years to build the sidewalks.

This is ridiculous and disgraceful. But we can change it. Right now, Austin spends about \$5 million per year on building sidewalks. If we spend 10 times that much, we can have sidewalks in our lifetime. If we don't, we can have a mean, dysfunctional city full of angry people in cars.


#### **BLOOD ON THE TRACKS**

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
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
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

#### Headlines

As soon as City Council passed last week's incentives package for Hanger Orthopedic Group, along came another one. L.A.-based LegalZoom is considering relocating to Austin, and council will hear about potential economic incentives for the company Feb. 11. For more, see "City Hall Hustle," p.16.

#### Capital Metro

announced Wednesday that President Obama's proposed 2011 fiscal year budget includes a recommendation of \$24 million for its "bus rapid transit"



project. If passed, this funding would add to the \$13.4 million already allocated for **MetroRapid**, bringing the total to 80% of the \$47 million needed. Bus rapid transit consists of limited-stop buses equipped with technology allowing them to change traffic lights to green. Service is scheduled to begin in 2012.

- Mayor Lee Leffingwell on Tuesday delivered his state of the city address to the Real Estate Council of Austin, warning that Austin is no longer "a sleepy little college town" and must start thinking and planning like a major city. See "Naked City," p.16.
- University of Texas President Bill Powers faced a 2½-hour grilling Tuesday from students and the Austin community over the decision by Texas Union officials to close the Cactus Cafe and end the informal classes program. See "A' Is for Axed," p.18, and "Off the Record," Music, p.49.)
- District Judge Stephen Yelenosky on Monday threw out a case against the Lower Colorado River Authority, ruling the agency was protected by the state's sovereign immunity statutes. The San Antonio Water System had sued the LCRA for \$1.2 billion for allegedly breaching a complex water-sharing deal.
- Attorney General Greg Abbott has filed a motion to have the city of Pflugerville and three other Texas cities removed from a lawsuit challenging the broadest terms of the Texas Open Meetings Act (see "Does the Open Meetings Act Go Too Far?," Jan. 8). Abbott's filing argues that cities have no First Amendment rights (thus giving them fewer legal protections than corporations).
- Democrat and former Houston Mayor Bill White is winning the fundraising stage of the race to be governor. In his latest reports, covering January, he raised \$755,067, beating Republican primary contenders Gov. Rick Perry (\$734,365) and Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison (\$269,940). White will face his lead opponent in the Democratic primary, Farouk Shami, in a debate to be broadcast live statewide from Fort Worth on Monday, Feb. 8. In Austin, tune in to KLRU or KVUE at 7pm.
- The state has gone without a gas tax hike since 1991. So at a joint meeting of Senate and House committees Monday, lawmakers heard testimony from local elected officials and anti-toll-road activists calling for an increase before the state runs out of money for roads and railways.
- The nation's top brass testified Tuesday in support of President Obama's call for the repeal of the armed forces' "don't ask, don't tell" policy, with the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff telling a Senate committee that it's wrong to force men and women to "lie about who they are in order to defend their fellow citizens."

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Central Texas hunger remains a slow-motion, invisible disaster

In the wake of the unimaginable disaster in Haiti – perhaps 200,000 killed outright, millions left homeless or starving – the worldwide outpouring of assistance to Haitians is undeniably impressive, even if it's been at times uneven and bureaucratic. Reportedly, nearly half of U.S. households have donated to the cause, and here in Austin, public and private groups have contributed whatever they can. That's a pattern in charitable response: When there's a headline catastrophe – a tsunami, a

hurricane, an earthquake – spontaneous giving creates its own tidal wave, sometimes overwhelming the short-term ability of care agencies to absorb it.

What happens between disasters? That's not so reassuring, as evidenced by "Hunger in America 2010," the report released Wednesday morning by the Capital Area

Food Bank of Texas. The national report was sponsored by Feeding America (formerly America's Second Harvest), the largest national network of emergency food aid. It was prepared by that agency in collaboration with consultancy Mathematica Policy Research, based on surveys of food banks and their clients, with sections tailored locally to reflect local conditions – in this case, Central Texas (21 counties in all). For a glance at the inside story of regional hunger, consider first what the local agency highlighted as the report's key local findings: 1) One in three food bank clients is a child, 2) 82% are not homeless, 3) almost half (43%) of the families needing emergency food aid have at least one working adult at home, 4) more than half of the families served had to

choose between buying food and paying utility bills, 5) one in five families experienced the physical pain of hunger, and 6) more than a third of older-adult clients live for extended periods without food.

Whatever you might think about the causes of poverty, that statistical profile doesn't fit the stereotypes of street-corner panhandlers who would rather drink than work; more than 80% of people served

by food banks (pantries, kitchens, shelters) manage to keep a roof over their heads yet are regularly without basic necessities. That profile is also in keeping with the hunger situation across the state; according to the Center for Public Policy Priorities, in 2008-2009, Texas was among 20 states with food hardship rates of 20% or higher, and 27.2% of Texas families reported difficulty affording food.

## **Naked City**

> STATE OF THE CITY. NOW AND BEYOND Mayor Lee Leffingwell (r) delivered his state of the city speech to a sold-out audience at a Real Estate Council of Austin luncheon on Feb. 2. While he didn't mention the city's comprehensive planning effort by name, he signaled its importance in noting that "an Austinite born today will almost certainly live in a city of nearly 1.5 million people - and a metropolitan area of well over 4 million people - by the time he or she is 40. I believe whole-



heartedly that our most basic responsibility as citizens of this special city should be to that future Austinite." He also sent a strong message on direction. After citing the long list of recent "best city" rankings calling attention to Austin's economy, Leffingwell urged the development community to protect the city's future economy and quality of life by supporting its longterm efforts: the water conservation plan, the climate protection plan, the Austin Energy generation plan, and the Strategic Mobility Plan (funded by an anticipated November bond referendum to include urban rail). "The question for Austin is not whether we will grow," said Leffingwell. "The question for Austin is how we will grow." Leffingwell also announced that he's convening a "mayor's summit on small business" to occur in late March, to explore new ways to support small local businesses. > COUNCIL TO PLAY CATCH-UP ON EAST RIVERSIDE Remember all the details of the East Riverside Corridor Master Plan? Well, neither does City Council - which could be adopting the plan Feb. 25. To refresh everyone's memory (it's been three years since the original council resolution and two since council selected a consultant), lead planner Tony **Nelessen** is flying into town to give a 25-minute briefing to council Thursday, Feb. 11, at 10:30am. The plan will have gone to the Planning Commission Feb. 9. Thanks to city departmental "silos," this Planning and Development Review Department effort isn't yet fully synced up with the Transportation Department's Strategic Mobility Plan. Both are working on transit-oriented development for the same corridor, but from two different perspectives. As has been noted in previous coverage (see "New Urbanism Comes to East Riverside," July 3, 2009), "the draft master plan hinges on the premise that rail transit will run down Riverside Drive, between I-35 and Ben White, and on out to the airport. Leveraging the transformational powers of transit-oriented development, the corridor plan shows East Riverside losing its car focus (e.g., a blur of parking lots and strip shopping centers) in favor of a people focus (attractive places to walk, recreate, eat, shop, and live)," Initial work on the Strategic Mobility Plan also goes to council Feb. 25. Look for an attentive council member or planning commissioner to suggest that the two departments create an East Riverside transit-oriented development plan - K.G. more collaboratively.

## WHO'S ZOOMIN' WHO? Right behind the Hanger comes LegalZoom

No sooner had the last incentives argument sped away, another one zoomed in.

The day after City Council's Jan. 28 unanimous vote to approve an incentives package for the **Hanger Orthopedic Group** – \$500,000 spanning 10 years, to entice the company into moving here – word leaked of another company eyeing Austin for relocation.

And leaked is the right word, for a few minutes after the news broke that Los Angeles-based LegalZoom was mulling a move to Austin, the information vanished from the city's website. (City Hall insiders called it a posting error, and the early reveal doesn't appear to have compromised the proposal.) The info was soon reposted, and like the Hanger proposal, the deal is mercifully simple and straightforward - and not least of all, cheap. LegalZoom, a privately held company founded in 2000 that allows users to create online legal docs like wills and incorporations, is considering relocating here its L.A.H.Q. (The company's Hollywood bona fides - one of the founders is O.J. Simpson attorney Robert Shapiro were illustrated by the code name bestowed on the thenstill-confidential proposal: "Project Red Carpet.")

In exchange for the relocation, the city would fork over a \$20,000 grant each year through 2020, provided the company completes the terms of the agreement. Those terms include creating 600 positions by 2016 and maintaining them until the agreement expires, along with \$1.75 million worth of improvements to its eventual headquarters in northwest Austin and sufficient use of local, minority, and women-owned contracting businesses. A financial analysis by the city predicts \$8.1 million worth of benefits from the deal, accounting for growth in taxes, utility revenues, and more, and \$7.5 million in costs in the form of city services, leaving a net benefit to the city of about \$563,000.

As with the Hanger debate, salaries will certainly inspire discussion. LegalZoom proposes adding jobs each year until it has created 600 new jobs by 2014. The average annual wage in 2010 is \$42,000, and it

inches up until hitting \$51,000 in 2014. However, the median wage – a more accurate gauge of salaries for those outside the boardroom – stays at \$31,000 from 2010 to 2012, before jumping to \$50,000 in 2013-2014. Moreover, as **Austin Interfaith** illustrated during the Hanger talks, the city's new vetting of economic incentives, while vastly improved, still doesn't implement a base wage that salaries can't dip below.

Maybe it's just incentive fatigue, but reaction to the proposal has been decidedly muted so far. At his state of the city address this week, Mayor **Lee Leffingwell** said, "So far, I like what I see" of the LegalZoom proposal. Despite small but persistent opposition to incentive deals as expanding Austin to an unmanageable size, Leffingwell is unabashedly in favor of economic development. While noting he personally opposed the Domain incentives when they were created, he said: "I'll do deals like the one we did with Hanger every day of the week: performance-based, judicious, focused on a targeted industry, good-paying jobs with good benefits, and cashpositive for taxpayers over the life of the deal. Moreover, tied

to larger incentives from the state's Texas Enterprise Fund" – which has signed on for an additional \$1 million contribution to LegalZoom – "which also have performance criteria that must be met. So I say, bring me more."

Despite Leffingwell's appetite for recruitment, there are some more specific concerns being raised about LegalZoom's business model. D'Ann Johnson of Texas RioGrande Legal Aid is con-

cerned the company comes dangerously close to acting as a de facto attorney for clients, potentially of them enon to lititation. Mercover, some of the sim

leaving them open to litigation. Moreover, some of the simpler, uncontested services LegalZoom provides can be found for free on sites like TexasLawHelp.org, through employees of the Travis County Law Library, or even through nonprofit groups like Johnson's. As she says, "\$1.2 million" – the cost of the city incentives and the state **Texas Enterprise Fund** grant – "buys a lot of paralegals." If the city approves the deal, she says, "Some education needs to be done about the free services that are available."

Compared to the millions spent and allocated for projects like the **Domain** or companies like **Samsung**, Leffingwell calling the LegalZoom proposal "judicious" is the understatement of the year. A \$20,000 grant would barely cover the

> company Christmas party, much less be a major economic incentive to move here. More likely, the company was looking to Austin for the reasons others do: A young, tech-savvy work force is a perfect match for a young, tech-savvy workplace.

Ultimately, it raises the question of why the city had to offer even minimal incentives in the first place – and the answer invariably is that other cities were offering them as well.

The LegalZoom deal will be formally presented to council Feb. 11. As long as the city does its due diligence in selecting stable corporations, and entering into "performancebased" and "cash-positive" agreements, we should proceed. But if there are doubts, the city shouldn't hesitate to roll up the red carpet.

Keep that in mind when the gubernatorial candidates (of whatever party) begin to drone on about the great Texas economy: Much of the time, more than a quarter of Texans can't afford food.

#### 50,000 a Week

There are other nuggets of information in the report that might raise a few eyebrows. Perhaps unsurprisingly, the percentages of people of different ethnic groups seeking aid are disproportional to the 21-county region population as a whole: 37.2% needing aid are non-Hispanic whites (70% of the regional population), 38.3% are Hispanic/ Latino (21%), and the African-American percentage (24.5%) of the needy is more than twice their share in the regional population (10%). (The rough regional calculations are mine, from census data. And in case you're wondering, more than 85% of food bank clients are U.S. citizens, although noncitizen households are more likely to experience food insecurity.) It's not news that poverty hits minority households most harshly; but it might surprise some readers that more than a third of food bank clients are white.

In raw numbers, how many people are we talking about? According to the report, the Capital Area Food Bank annually provides emergency food for about 285,000 people (a 63% increase since the 2006 report), or about 48,000 different people in an average week. Some 325 agencies participate in this Central Texas project – and every week, nearly 50,000 of our neighbors must rely on public charity to feed their families.

#### **High Water Rising**

On Tuesday, Mayor Lee Leffingwell delivered his state of the city address to an audience of businesspeople, and it was full of superlatives: "best performing metropolitan economy" (Milkin Institute); "best big city in America for jobs" (Forbes); best investment prospects for commercial real estate (Grubb & Ellis); best American city for small business (Portfolio.com); best in composite statistics reflecting economy, crime, environment, life expectancy (Farmer's Insurance Group). Leffingwell did acknowledge immediately that not all is rosy; our current 7% (official) unemployment rate is the highest in 10 years.

The next morning, the mayor joined a group of public-minded citizens and the Capital Area Food Bank to announce the local release of the "Hunger in America" report, full of the sobering statistics I've briefly summarized above. It's undeniable that in these hard times, Austin is doing better right now than most regions of the country. How is it, then, that anywhere from a fifth to a quarter of our fellow citizens are not sharing in that common prosperity? There is something structurally wrong with this economy - reflected in a dearth of entry-level jobs for the people most in need of them; in a laughable minimum-wage rate that cannot support a single person's basic expenses, let alone those of a family; in a state political culture that prioritizes low property taxes (i.e., on accumulated wealth) above all other community priorities - even as working Texans must choose among food or utilities or health care and must rely on public charity for sustenance.

What is to be done? Among other things, we need to be aware that hunger and poverty are more often slow-motion disasters than high-intensity, cable-TV photo ops. We need to remember that the underside of state and city incentives for major employers is the structural unemployment and underemployment that leaves a large number of our neighbors destitute (while depressing wages for the rest of us). We need to raise as much public, political concern for hungry people as we reflexively do for neglected trees or abandoned pets. And we need to figure out ways to address long-term, institutional poverty that doesn't rely only on headline charity campaigns that come and go like a passing storm.



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## 'A' Is for Axed: UT Chops Cactus, Cuts Classes

According to its mission statement, UT-Austin's **Texas Union** is dedicated to "serve as a unifying force in the quality of campus life by fostering a sense of community, emphasizing collaboration, and cultivating enduring regard for the University of Texas." Yet a Jan. 29 decision by the Union board to support an executive decision to end the **informal classes program** and to close the iconic **Cactus Cafe** has caused a storm of protest and raised the question of who is included in that "community."

While the announced closure of the Cactus Cafe after 31 years caused an immediate outpouring of anger from the music community (see "Off the Record," Music, p.49), the quieter loss of the informal classes is equally significant. Founded in 1971, the program is designed to provide short, affordable courses for the whole Austin community. It offers

everything from a one-day small-business boot camp (\$36) to a 10-session English-as-a-secondlanguage course (\$72). The classes take place in a variety of locations on the UT campus, as well as in local businesses and online, and roughly 25,000 people now take part **annually** in the more than 2,000 classes offered.

Requests to talk to the Union board (which is drawn from the student body, Student Government, and faculty members appointed by UT President **Bill Powers**) were initially referred to University Unions Executive Director **Andy Smith**, who argued that he presented the cuts to the board as a matter of priorities. "Last fall," he said, "the university informed all departments that they should prepare a plan to accommodate a 2 percent merit-pay pool in each of the next two years

out of existing funds." He had to find \$122,000 over the next two years to cover that recurring cost, he said, and in looking for cuts, "the president had indicated that we should pay close attention to our mission."

The standard Smith decided to use was simple: "How much are the students involved in each of these areas?" Two areas stood out. "In informal classes," Smith explained, "probably 85 to 90 percent are not students, and in the Cactus Cafe, it's probably 90 to 95 percent, if you looked at the audience in there." Since the Union has been subsidizing both entities for several years, he made what he called the "sad and regrettable" decision to cut these programs.

Student Government President Liam O'Rourke, who sits on the board, was eager to correct one common misunderstanding.

"The Texas Union board did not vote on the matter," he said. "We gave our input as an advisory body." The only option presented by Smith at the meeting was for the cuts, and while the board asked about alternative revenue sources like reducing Student Events Center funding or shorter opening hours instead, Smith told the board those options would not work. O'Rourke said, "We rely on our advisers to give us good information, and my experience to date hasn't led me to believe that we had false information."

The question remains whether the board had any real role in the cuts: While Powers repeatedly told the crowd at his Feb. 2 town hall budget meeting that this was a decision by the student body, in fact the decision had already been made by Smith. The

board merely acted to endorse it.

According to figures provided by

Smith at the town hall meeting, in the 2008-09 biennium, the Union subsidized the cafe to the tune of \$66,000 (in earlier conversations he put that figure nearer \$50,000), and the informal classes for \$106,000. Canceling them would produce the \$122,000 he was looking for while allowing retention of staff. As things stand, the funding for the two programs will end Aug. 31, at the close of the university's fiscal year, but Smith said he expected the programs will simply not return from their normal midsummer hiatus.

As an auxiliary operation funded through student union fees, the Union would reap any benefits of the changes: "The savings from the Union will stay with the Union," said UT Chief Financial Officer **Kevin Hegarty**, who also added that full-time staff

from both programs will be offered alternative employment. That concession likely provides little relief for the class lecturers who are drawn from throughout the community and paid by the hour for the courses they teach.

The current controversy is not Smith's first. Throughout his 23-year tenure with the Union, there have been frequent complaints regarding his actions, such as his decision to replace **Union Dining Services** facilities with leases to corporate fast-food franchises including Wendy's and Chick-fil-A. In 1997, there were widespread calls for his resignation when he oversaw the termination of the **Texas Union Film Program** and the removal of veteran film booker **Steve Bearden** (see "The Last Picture Show," Jan. 23, 1998). Filmmaker **Kyle Henry**, whose 1999 documentary *University*

*Inc.* followed that controversy, believes that these latest cuts are simply a rerun of that experience. Smith "speaks as if he acts in students' best interest," said Henry. "He used financial data to say they're not voting with their pocketbooks. He used budget figures with the Union where he used the program cost versus box office, not taking into account that students' fees are supposed to pay for losses."

Smith argues that these latest changes will better serve students while stabilizing the Union budget. Yet the UT community – which the Union is supposed to serve – includes more than just full-time undergraduates. Smith's estimate that only 10-15% of informal class attendees are UT students does not acknowledge that altogether, students, their families, and UT staff make up 35% of informal class attendees. In some classes, the majority of participants are directly affiliated with the university. And Smith rejected outright the idea that the program could have increased tuition by a few dollars per student per class to cover the shortfall. "Raising prices when there is not a general reason to do that, like an increase in your raw product, is not something that drives in additional business," he said.

The university will still provide services through its open enrollment Division of Continuing Education. But these courses are much closer in nature (and in price) to college courses than to the informal classes. **Austin Community College** trustee **Tim Mahoney** argues that the Union board's vote is simply a sign that the state's flagship academic institution is failing in its core task – to educate the population of the state. "They have to understand," he said, "that having that as part of their mission is fundamental to their economic sustainability." – *Richard Whittaker*

## **MUCH ADO ON THE DAIS**

Another relatively sleepy meeting for City Council this Feb. 4 doesn't mean there's no drama on the dais. Below, highlights for upcoming council meetings:

**GREEN MEANS GO** This meeting has several eco-friendly items. Item 2 accepts \$7.5 million in federal stimulus funds to make city buildings more **energy-efficient**, creating as many as 100 temporary jobs in the process. Item 3 establishes a more equitable **solar rebate program**. The previous rebate program had to be shuttered as a victim of its own success, as commercial and multifamily developers took most of the rebate cash. Now homeowners can take advantage of solar rebates while commercial/multifamily users will be refunded via "performancebased incentive payments." And Item 38, set at 6pm, is a public hearing and possible action on the city's long-gestating **Heritage Tree** provisions.

**PLAY BALL** An addendum to the agenda, Item 39 takes up use of city fields by **youth athletics** programs, an item postponed from last week. As we previously wrote, under the agreement, the city would cover the costs of lighting fields for sports programs such as Little League up to a certain amount acceptable in the Parks and Recreation budget. In exchange, teams would maintain and improve the fields.

**ZONED OUT** A brief agenda doesn't mean there's no zoning-related fun! Item 28, from lead sponsor **Laura Morrison**, asks the city manager to have the city work with the University of Texas and the Heritage Society of Austin in applying for as much as \$250,000 of federal **Preserve America grant funds** to develop "an historic survey web tool" as part of the city's overall preservation program. Elsewhere, Item 30 sets a hearing for a zoning variance request from the neighborhood-

niks' favorite boogeyman, **Richard Suttle**. Suttle is representing barbecue joint and live music venue **Stubb's Bar-B-Q**, which is seeking to have existing structures built in the floodplain validated. The hearing is slated to be set Feb. 11.

**ON TO THE NEXT** Council's Feb. 11 meeting should be a doozy, marking the birth of new contentious issues and the return of old ones. Chief among the 10:30am briefings is a presentation on proposed economic incentives to entice **LegalZoom** into moving its headquarters here. Public comment is allowed on this presentation and additionally on Feb. 18, when council has tentatively set a second public hearing and possible approval of the incentives. (For more on LegalZoom, see "City Hall

Hustle," p.16.) And a contract with **Greenstar North America** to recycle the city's single-stream recyclables is back, after being punted from the Feb. 4 draft agenda. The delay was likely created by the city's charge that Greenstar and competitor Texas Disposal Systems both violated the city's anti-lobbying ordinance; as both teams are expected bidders on creating a local materials recovery facility, the backbone of a recycling system, the ethics snafu may affect the timeline of the contract.

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## Guns, Property, and Public Nuisances: A North Austin Showdown

More than 200 people gathered at Austin Police Department headquarters Jan. 25 to protest what they consider unconstitutional police action in shuttering a monthly North Austin gun show – an action they say infringes on Second Amendment gun rights. Protesters with **Texans for Accountable Government**, **Ladies of Liberty Alliance**, and followers of radio show host **Alex Jones** used dueling bullhorns – often simultaneously – to declare that the police action that earlier this month indirectly ended gun shows at the North Austin Event Center (formerly the Crockett Center) was an act of tyranny. "The answer to 1984," Jones exhorted the crowd, "is 1776."

While unilateral action by police to close down an otherwise legal gun show would almost certainly violate state and federal gun laws as well as constitutional protections, the situation that has put the monthly gun show on indefinite hold isn't so cut-and-dried. Instead, the dispute pits Second Amendment protections against state law that covers the abatement of a public nuisance – and the rights of a property owner to do with that property as the owner sees fit.

The gun shows have been taking place monthly under one promoter or another for more than a decade. According to TAG, Jones, and various online posts, the APD and the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives essentially directed H-E-B. the lessor of the property, to shut down the show. According to police, the decision to stop hosting the shows was actually made by H-E-B, as part of a nuisance abatement process begun by police in mid-2009. While working with federal agents in a long-term operation targeting illegal gun trafficking, Austin Police say they documented numerous problems connected with the event center gun shows, especially the ones hosted last year by Saxet Gun & Trade Shows, the largest gun-show promoter in Texas. There were at least eight arrests of felons and illegal immigrants, who are forbidden under law from obtaining or owning weapons. (Among these was the high-profile arrest of Austin boxer James Kirkland, arrested as a felon-

#### Moriarty Case Back in Court

Last Wednesday, Jan. 27, the **Bill Moriarty** case landed at the 3rd Court of Appeals. In 2005, Moriarty was dismissed as program director of the **Austin Clean Water Program** by general contractor **Earth Tech**, after the city discovered that he and **Diane Hyatt**, of the tech firm Hyatt and Associates, had become a couple sometime during Moriarty's tenure and that Hyatt's firm had been assigned ACWP contracts – although Moriarty did not handle contract assignments.

The city auditor and other investigators found no wrongdoing, but City Manager **Toby Futrell** said the perceived conflict of interest and a failure to disclose it required Moriarty's dismissal, and she prevailed upon Earth Tech to drop the hammer. Moriarty and Hyatt claimed that in fact rival contractors and their lobbyists had conspired to pressure Futrell to oust him, and in 2006 they sued city officials and several contracting firms and their representative. The officials settled later that year; District Judge Margaret Cooper granted a summary judgment in favor of the

in-possession after his girlfriend conducted a straw purchase for him in April 2009.)

The illegal sales documented by police were each made by unlicensed firearms dealers or private individuals, either inside the show or in the parking lot. While there is no law that prevents the private sale of firearms by individuals (unless the seller knows that the purchaser is prohibited), the pattern of illegal sales, the subsequent arrests, and the associated public safety concerns were, police say, a clear and ongoing problem. "I don't believe [the sellers] were intentionally committing criminal acts," said APD Detective **T.J. Vineyard**, who is part of the department's Firearm Review Unit, "but we have to address the issue of reckless and negligent" sales.

APD's Nuisance Abatement Unit began its own investigation. Meanwhile, management of the property, under a sublease with H-E-B (leasing in turn from landowner Wal-Mart), changed hands and the Saxet show was not asked back. Beginning last fall, **Texas Gun Shows**, a family operation run by 32-year-old Darwin Boedeker, rented the space for its monthly show.

By the time the abatement unit completed its work and called a meeting with stakeholders on Jan. 14, Boedeker's show had been operating out of the events center once a month for four months. During that time, Boedeker noted and APD confirmed, police did not make a single arrest inside or outside the show. Nonetheless, abatement actions attach to a property and not an individual - meaning that, ultimately, it is H-E-B's responsibility (under its own Wal-Mart lease) to ensure that no one uses the property for illegal purposes. Vineyard said that during the January meeting with H-E-B, former APD Officer Andrew Perkel (who now subleases the property from the grocery store chain). and Boedeker (who was scheduled to host his fifth show that weekend), police made recommendations to the grocer about how to address legal concerns without having to shutter the show. They recommended that the promoter hire security to monitor parking lot activity and that he require all private firearm sales to be completed by federally

licensed sellers, who are required to conduct background checks on buyers.

Vineyard says APD did not mandate these as conditions of continuing the shows without police intervention. "They were just suggestions," he said, "not directions." H-E-B agreed with the suggestions and, via Perkel, said they would be made a condition of allowing gun shows at the site. Boedeker reluctantly agreed - with a scheduled show just two days away, he said, he felt there was no other choice; still, he didn't think the action was fair or even legal. He contends that APD wasn't even aware that Saxet, under whose promotion of the show all those arrests had been made, was no longer hosting the events. "They had no idea we were even a different show," he said. "That's what took me so off-guard." That's not true, says Vineyard. And although no arrests had been made in the months since Boedeker had taken over. police had "observed" the same pattern of problems previously seen at the Saxet shows.

Whatever the case, things did not end well. Although Boedeker had told his vendors that only licensed dealers would be able to sell firearms at the Jan. 16-17 show, one made a private sale to a man identified as an illegal immigrant. The purchaser was arrested, and the vendor was questioned and released. That was enough for H-E-B; they informed Perkel that for now, no gun shows would be allowed at the event center. "We have a commitment to our neighborhoods," said H-E-B spokeswoman Leslie Lockett. "There is a lot of pedestrian activity [at that site] and a ton of families with small children" in the neighborhood, prompting the grocer to "put on hold" any further shows "until we get more clarity" about what is going on at the site.

As word spread, in an online video vociferous radio showman Jones brandished a flier that Boedeker posted at the show regarding the new requirements, saying it was a mandate from APD and ATF. "This is tyranny; this is the end of America," he announced. TAG and its allies announced the APD protest. However, in stumping about the importance of constitutional rights, Jones, TAG, and even Boedeker seem to have overlooked the rights of the property owners – including the choice to not host a gun show at the site.

Erich Pratt, communications director of the national gun rights group Gun Owners of America, does see some cause for concern in the episode. He says this is the first instance his group is aware of in which a municipality has used state nuisance abatement laws indirectly to close a gun show. "From our perspective it seemed a bit heavy-handed," he said. The APD's recommendations "may be merely suggestions, but what happens if they don't comply?" Indeed, there is "no controlling law" in Texas or a federal statute that would mandate private gun sales be completed through licensed dealers. (That is the law in seven states, but not in Texas.) And when you consider that only roughly 2% of crime guns are purchased at gun shows, he said, the restrictions seem unnecessary. "We think this is a horrible precedent - a wink-wink, nod-nod that these are 'recommendations,'" he said. "And our hope is that this does not become the norm."

Boedeker is currently looking for another local site to hold his monthly show. – *Jordan Smith* 



remaining defendants, primarily for insufficient evidence that their influence at City Hall led to the dismissal.

The issue under appeal last week was whether those defendants – various engineering firms, among them CH2M Hill, Malcolm Pirnie, and PBS&J, as well as former mayor and now lobbyist **Bruce Todd** – must instead stand trial for "tortious interference" with Moriarty's Earth Tech contract, for having pressured Futrell and former Assistant City Manager **Joe Canales** to find some reason to remove Moriarty.

Moriarty's attorney **Robert Notzon** argued that a jury needs to determine whether Futrell and Canales were telling the truth when they testified in depositions that the contractors' influence was not the reason for removing Moriarty; the defendants' attorneys countered that there is insufficient evidence to sustain that claim and that, in any case, Futrell didn't need a reason to ask for a new program director. The appeals court is expected to make its ruling later this year. - Michael King

## **Muffing the MRF** TDS & Greenstar cited for lobbying

An already brutal argument over how the city of Austin handles its recycling may now become a testing ground for its lobbying ordinances.

On Jan. 27, Mayor Lee Leffingwell, the City Council, and City Manager Marc Ott were informed by chief purchasing officer Byron Johnson that both Texas Disposal Systems and Greenstar North America were in violation of the city's anti-lobbying rules and would therefore be excluded from submitting a bid in response to the city's request for proposal for the long-awaited materials recovery facility, or MRF. That's a major reversal: Not only were Greenstar and TDS widely considered to be among the top contenders for the MRF project, but council is considering extending its current recycling contract with Greenstar for

an extra year, to September 2011 (see "Solid Waste Services," Dec. 4, 2009).

The two firms have fallen afoul of a city ordinance, adopted in 2008, allowing the purchasing officer to enforce the city's anti-lobbying and procurement rules. On Dec. 8, 2009, TDS CEO Bob Gregory e-mailed several people, including Assistant City Manager Robert Goode and members of the Solid Waste Advisory Commission.

requesting that the city reject any contract extension with Greenstar and instead wait for the results of the request for proposal to see what options were available. Greenstar attorney Neal Rackleff responded Dec. 15, 2009, sending a letter to the purchasing office and City Attorney David Smith in which he argued that the TDS letter was a potential violation of the lobbying ordinance. After consulting with city Integrity Officer John Steiner, Johnson ruled that both firms were actually in violation of the rules and so disgualified both. Steiner said: "The ordinance prohibits people who are competing

for city contracts from contacting anyone other than the authorized contact person identified in the solicitation. In this particular case, it was ruled that they

had [done so]."

Gregory argued that the ruling depends on such a broad interpretation of the statute that it effectively bars him from discussing any recycling issues with the city. He said that, before writing the e-mail, "I checked with my lawyers, and they said this was a separate issue" from the MRF. Gregory has long been critical of both the existing underperforming contract – a contract that was only necessary because the city did not have its own MRF in October 2008 when it shifted to single-stream recycling - and the proposed amendments. He said, "The staff's strict interpretation of

the lobbying law would not allow us to talk about any of the recycling projects or proposals or ordinances that the council and [Solid Waste Advisory Commission] will be dealing with throughout the spring."

If adopted, the new contract would cut the handling fees the city pays by \$3.50 a ton (roughly 4%). However, the city is currently obligated only to provide Greenstar with about 64% of its recyclables through October 2010. The new deal would make that 100% through March 2011 - the expected date for the new MRF to begin operation - and then 50% until October 2011. Gregory said his concern was making sure that the contract extension received the kind of oversight that he felt was lacking when it was initially signed. He said: "Those things would have been

apparent in 2008 had the staff made the contract public. Here we are in 2010, and they're doing the same thing again."

Both firms have filed protests against the ruling with the procurement office; those will be heard Feb. 5. Greenstar's attorneys argue that the ruling is contrary to the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct, a state code which may preempt any city ordinance,

while TDS' attorneys wade into the controversial territory of the First Amendment rights of business and called it "a restriction of free speech and the right of TDS to address its government on matters that could affect its business opportunities."

According to the Jan. 27 memo, both firms have also been informed that their appeals will not affect the scheduling for discussion of the MRF. However, council has pushed back the vote on the contract extension from Jan. 28 to Feb. 4, and it's now on the draft agenda for the Feb. 11 meeting. Solid Waste Advisory Commission Vice Chair

Rick Cofer said, "Basically, people are still waiting to see the contract before deciding what to do." So with two leading con-

tenders out of the hunt, who else might apply to run the MRF? The final date for submissions for the request for proposal is Feb. 9, at which point the proposals will be handed over to a selection committee for presentation to council in June. The city deliberately left the request for proposal open-ended so that it could have a broad array of options, from a simple sorting plant to a more elaborate recycling facility, and has also not ruled out building its own publicly owned and run facility. However, Gregory still hopes that council will consider his bid. He said: "They said we're disqualified. We say we're not." - Richard Whittaker





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
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#### **Task Force Tango** Comprehensive planning group struggles to find its role

The **Comprehensive Plan Citizens Advisory Task Force** group has been slow to gel – in part because council kept adding members to ensure representative diversity, in part because its exact role and powers haven't been clarified. But at its Jan. 26 meeting – the fifth in four months of existence – the volunteer group finally began making progress on a road map for Austin's future.

The task force is stocked with smart, active people who are frustrated that they aren't being better used. "We need assignments!" begged **Greg Esparza** at the Jan. 12 meeting. "We aren't getting the full benefit of all the brain power in this room," another objected. Members asked tough questions of the consultants and staff, nailing weaknesses in the outreach plan – especially the lack of quantifiable goals.

At the December task force meeting, members had pushed back and the mood turned contentious after **John Fernsler**, a principal with consultancy **Wallace Roberts & Todd**, directed the group to start work on a vision statement – members objected that too little of the community input was yet available. City Manager **Marc Ott** observed the troubling dynamic in the room; afterward, he took steps to give the whole comprehensive planning process more executive-team support by addressing gaps in communication, organization, and structure. Assistant City Manager **Sue Edwards** is now tasked with smoothing the way (see "Imagining Austin," Jan. 29).

At the Jan. 12 meeting (with Edwards in attendance), more tensions surfaced. The task force received good data from city staff and WRT on the demographics of public participation. They heard that more than 1,200 responses had come in to date. (That number is now higher; the survey remains online through March 1 at www.imagineaustin.net.) A graphic showed how participants compare to the overall demographic makeup of Austin: member Mark Lind commented, "We're doing really well with well-educated whites in the inner city, but we're not doing that well with everyone else." Staff said they are taking steps so that overall input roughly matches the demographics of Austin, citing as an example a well-attended Meeting in a Box at the Asian American Cultural Center. But members weren't satisfied. "Time is so critical now. There's a sense of urgency that we need to get them involved," said Ora Houston, of low-income African-Americans and other underrepresented groups. "There needs to be work done in between monthly meetings."

#### **Stifled by Open Meetings**

A goal of this phase of work is crafting a vision statement; a draft is currently scheduled to go to the Planning Commission and City Council for adoption in late March. Council's charge to the task force included: articulating Austin's common values, championing the plan to encourage broad-based citizen participation, serving as a conduit for community concerns, and helping to craft the vision and consensus. But members remain confounded by basic procedural issues. What actions can they take between meetings? How can they make progress as a group? Serving as chair is former Travis County District Court Judge Margaret Cooper, reportedly tapped as a respected neutral party. But a number of members and observers said she isn't proving the right facilitator of meaningful action.

At the Jan. 12 meeting, Cooper raised hackles by presiding more like a judge than a chair. Members found themselves constrained by the downside of the Open Meetings Act DEVELOPING - which legally governs the city's designated "task forces" stories and prohibits members from talking or e-mailing with one another, except at publicly posted meetings, if a quorum (or even a "walking quorum") might occur. Yet members have been charged by council with serving as "ambassadors" to the community and with collaborating to find common ground; as Regina Rogoff, Mark Yznaga, and others pointed out, that's a difficult role to play if you can't all communicate or creatively devise action plans at monthly meetings.

"This is a process, and to cut it off and stifle it is putting a rein on us," one member objected to Cooper, after city legal presented a long warning on Open Meetings Act restrictions. "Why not be creative? We're a brainstorming group." Cooper seemed most comfortable enforcing points of law under Open Meetings Act rules, thereby making certain the group took no actions not posted on the agenda. As the evening wore on, frustrations erupted. "I don't think the City Council intended us to be hamstrung from accomplishing anything," protested Rogoff. "It's 'Imagine Austin!'" she commented later. "How can you imagine anything if you can't talk about anything unless it's posted on the agenda?"

Cooper was unable to move the large group through the agenda in the allotted two hours; that necessitated adding the Jan. 26 meeting. By then, thanks in part to interventions by Edwards (and much huddling by concerned council members), the tenor had improved. Members were briefed on the Community Inventory – a 400-page data book on all things Austin - and its preliminary planning implications (see www.imagineaustin.net/inventory. htm). In a show of support, all three members of the relevant City Council subcommittee attended - Chair Sheryl Cole, Laura Morrison, and Chris Rilev - as did Mayor Lee Leffingwell and Bill Spelman. Afterward, Ott and Edwards both noted with satisfaction that task force members broke into a smile when they finally took a first action - voting to empower a newly formed outreach committee, chaired by Perla Cavazos, for that purpose and more specifically the second community forum.

"The council is aware that there are concerns regarding several issues

surrounding the comp plan," said Cole. "We want to respond quickly by taking up the issues at the next subcommittee meeting [Feb. 1], including how the Open Meetings Act is affecting the task force. At the end of the day, it's not council's plan; it's Austin's plan for years to come."

The risk now is that the task force - rich in community activists but weak on the business community - will become mired in questions of public participation rather than tackling the central planning problems. "I think the challenge is to realize that, as worthwhile as public participation is, it's a part of planning, but it isn't in itself planning," commented member Frederick Steiner, who is dean of the University of Texas School of Architecture and a nationally respected planner. "We need to move ahead to address some of the really important issues that the comprehensive plan can help address. For example, in all of the forums I've been involved in so far, transportation has come up as a major issue. That will require quite a bit of very careful analysis. We also have issues of clean air, clean water, and so much more. ... If you direct growth in a certain area, what are the trade-offs? Congestion, where do the new people go, the issues of preservation of neighborhoods and density - those are the big issues for me."

#### Dome Sweet Dome

Anyone driving from Austin to Dallas has probably seen them: a series of concrete domes strung together to look like a giant caterpillar. It's a lot more than a roadside architectural curiosity. It's home to the **Monolithic Dome** 



Institute, which, along with Haitian rapper and entrepreneur Won-G, has formed the One Dome at a Time nonprofit. Its plan is to create a village of 500 EcoShell domes to provide permanent housing in Haiti. Institute president **David South** explained: "Haiti's need is larger right now than anything we've seen. You're talking about mind-boggling numbers of people without housing."

This is not the institute's first such project. South explained, "A little over a year ago, we built about 100 structures in Indonesia, where an earthquake had wiped out a village." Through the Domes for the World program, they are readying proposals for similar programs in Dubai, Ethiopia, and Sudan. Smith and Won-G were already working on a proposal for Haiti and were originally scheduled to meet with Haitian President René Préval's office on the day of the earthquake. Now the proposal has added urgency. South said: "The U.S. military asked me, 'How fast can you put these up?' And I said: 'I can't put them up as fast as you can put up a tent. But if you get the roadblocks out of the way, make sure I have the cement, and let me use the local labor, in six weeks I can have 10 to 20 buildings. In six more weeks, I'll have you between 100 and 200

buildings. After that, it's just a matter of if we can get the ground plowed and out of the way."

An EcoShell is simple to build: An inflated hemispheric airform is reinforced with steel rebar and then coated with three inches of concrete. That simplicity, combined with durability and low cost, is what could make them ideal for post-disaster reconstruction. Based on his Indonesian experience, where \$1 million provided housing for 71 families as well as a church, medical clinic, and utilities, South calculates the Haitian village could cost \$5 million. While that sounds like a lot, South has advised partner agencies to look long-term. He said, "I told them, 'If they're not still standing after 500 years, you call me and we'll talk about it.'" 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# Rehabilitating the Criminal Justice System

On Jan. 21, roughly 10 months after it was introduced in the U.S. Senate, the **National Criminal Justice Commission** Act of 2009 passed out of the Judiciary Committee with bipartisan support. The bill, which calls for a complete review of the nation's criminal justice system, now heads to the floor for a full vote.

If the success of the bill in committee is any indication – it earned the nod from influential judiciary GOP Sens. Lindsey Graham (also a co-sponsor of the bill) and Jeff Sessions – then the prospect of its passage out of the Senate is strong. The bill, filed last spring by Virginia Democratic Sen. Jim Webb, is ambitious: Review the entire criminal justice system from top to bottom, decide what's working and what isn't, and make recommendations to fix what's broken. And all

topics will be up for discussion including whether the nation's drug laws are actually effective.

The commission would be the first of its kind since

the establishment in 1965 of the **President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of** Justice. That group spent close to two years conducting its review before bringing to Congress 200 recommendations to make the system better. More than 40 years later, Webb thinks it's time to revisit the issue. "The overwhelming support from both sides of the aisle for restructuring our criminal justice system is very encouraging for our country," Webb said. "We are taking an inclusive, broad-based approach here, and I believe that's the best way to move our country away from a system based on ideology and fear, and toward what is fair

The bill has received support from a broad coalition and late last month earned endorsements from the Fraternal Order of Police and the International

Association of Chiefs of Police. "For far too long our nation's law enforcement and criminal justice system has lacked a strategic plan to guide an integrated public safety and homeland security effort in the years ahead," IACP President Michael **Carroll** said. "For these reasons, it is imperative that the [bill] be enacted as

quickly as possible." Many drug-law reformers agree, including advocates with Families Against reefer **Mandatory Minimums**: "Any comprehensive reform

of our criminal justice system must include eliminating mandatory minimum laws," said Jennifer Seltzer

> legislative affairs. "Onesize-fits-all mandatory drug sentencing laws enacted in the 1980s are responsible for filling prisons

with low-level, nonviolent drug offenders, wasting millions in taxpayer dollars, and destroying public trust in the criminal justice system," she said. Indeed, states have already begun to do away with manmin sentencing. In mid-January, outgoing New Jersey Gov. Jon Corzine signed into law a bill that eliminated man-min sentences for some drug crimes, and in December Rhode Island eliminated all man-min sentences for drug crimes.

If passed, the Criminal Justice Commission would have 18 months and up to \$14 million to complete its review and would sunset 60 days after reporting its findings and recommendations to Congress.

## **City Takes Business to Task Over Cleared Trees**

Fittingly, coming just a week before City Council is due to discuss strengthening protections for Austin's trees - a discussion that should be happening Thursday, Feb. 4, as this issue hits the stands – the city of Austin has taken action against a South Congress auto salvage yard for illegally clearing trees from a large area of land.

On Jan. 29, city officials accused Capitol City Auto Parts of clearing - without a permit - an estimated 100 trees from about 10 acres of land adjacent to South Boggy Creek. Capitol City owner Rob Ormand replied that he cleared the land to remove cover for transients who were breaking into his salvage yard and stealing parts. Ormand also says that his employees knocked down far more trees than he intended and that he never wanted protected trees to be cleared, only cedars. But he also maintains that the city is overestimating the damage done. The city issued a stop-work order on the property, and both the city and Ormand say they are cooperating to resolve the situation.

The violation was originally discovered because of a call to the city's pollution hotline Jan. 28 reporting automotive fluids released into the creek. City officials said no evidence of a spill was found, but the clearing is serious because of flooding dangers. Kevin Shunk of the city's Flood Plain Office said the clearing could redirect flow into other parts of the creek or into a road, and the debris of the uprooted trees could wash downstream and block culverts and bridges. "This is serious because of the amount of trees removed and the damage performed to the floodplain," said city arborist Michael Embesi. "It's a truly unique case. This does not happen, fortunately, very much."

"I never authorized any of my employees to push over any pecan or oak trees," Ormand told the Chronicle. "We have had an epidemic of theft for years. We found a campsite of transients ... on my property, among the cedar trees. We've been running them out of our property for years.


"What we found down there was nothing but a health hazard," says Ormand. "The city has done nothing about that. We spent days down here cleaning out 2 acres of feces, trash, waste, beer bottles, hypodermic needles." When he saw what his employees had done, says Ormand, "it made me sick to my stomach." Ormand says he was out of town at the time of the clearing. "I couldn't eat for two days for what my dumbass employees did to my property.

"I'm not a tree murderer," he says, arguing that he knows the trees would have added value to a property that likely will eventually attract development.

Ormand did complain about his initial contact with the city, saying environmental inspector Lee Lawson was verbally abusive. Lawson says she has since apologized to Ormand for "unprofessional" behavior brought on by an "overwhelming" situation.

Regardless of Ormand's intent, city officials say the real issue is that he proceeded with tree clearing - an action considered to be "development" - without seeking the proper permits, and sediment has entered the creek. "We have a review process when we allow property to be developed," said Embesi. "A permit is needed to do the work that was done. We have a strict criteria to follow no matter which excuse is being used."

At this time, if Ormand pleads guilty, he would be subject to a \$1,429 fine plus \$63 in court costs, but that amount could climb if the investigation finds he cut trees that fall into a protected category or other violations were committed. He will be expected to replace some trees, as well. Ormand said he and his attorneys will continue to discuss the situation. - Lee Nichols

#### **OBAMA'S DECLINE**

Want to know why Obama and the Democrats find themselves in a political mess, only a year after they came into power on a political high?

Last year, drug companies alone poured \$20 million into the coffers of state politicians, and it's estimated that industry-wide donations to state lawmakers this year will be well above \$100 million – more than these corporate interests will spend on congressional races.

The state-level gut job is not a scattershot effort. It is being orchestrated by a network of corporate-funded think tanks, foundations, and front groups. The main legislative tool for blocking the federal reform is a state nullification idea that came out of the Goldwater Institute, a farright-wing think tank in Arizona. In turn, the American Legislative Exchange Council, a corporate-funded front group created specifically to influence state legislators, adopted the Goldwater idea last year and is shopping it around – the nullification scheme has already been introduced in 15 states.

#### A closer look at the Downtown bike boulevard proposals

Just to be clear: The city of Austin has no confirmed plan for creating a "bicycle boulevard" on Nueces Street between Third Street and Martin Luther King Boulevard. The city is officially still in the public input stages and insists "nothing is set in stone." Rather, the detailed plan you see on these pages is the product of the League of Bicycling Voters.

Clarity is definitely needed in the proposal to turn Nueces into a bike boulevard, as fearful property owners and other interested parties along Nueces don't seem to be entirely certain

what is being proposed. For starters, even the term "bicycle boulevard," by the city's own admission, might conjure up images of a street off-limits to automobiles, which is not at all the case.

One thing is certain: The proposal is generating heavy interest, judging by the packed houses at Pease Elementary in December (see "A Boulevard for Cyclists ... and Cars," Dec. 18, 2009) and January.

We'll try to offer some clarity here, too, with these illustrations, some debunking, and a dash of opinion. What *is* being proposed: A way to make bicycles a higher priority on Nueces, creating an avenue through the west side of Downtown that 1) is safer than some other streets, 2) is inviting to cyclists of all ability levels, and 3) connects with the Lance Armstrong Bikeway – all while still allowing automobile traffic. Some property and business owners, and some cyclists, assert that Rio Grande would be a better street for the boulevard, and the city has said planners will explore that option as well.

#### Devil's in the Details

Not much seems to have changed between the December and January meetings. The city clearly wants this to happen (although Public Works officials insist that "no boulevard" is still an option). So does a large and vocal contingent of bicyclists, as the property and business owners make equally vocal arguments against it while trying to emphasize they are not against making the city friendly to cyclists.

The city is trying to mediate its way between those positions with a 10-member stakeholder group composed of property owners, city staff (including Bicycle Program Manager Annick Beaudet), and representatives of the Downtown Austin Alliance, Pease Elementary, Austin Community College, and the League of Bicycling Voters.

The city hired traffic engineer Heidi Ross to conduct a traffic impact study of the area. Ross announced at the January workshop that she will be looking at three scenarios: 1) nobuild (leaving the street as-is), 2) short-term implementation (what will happen in the first six months), and 3) long-term (how traffic might look after redevelopment of the area has occurred, in both the Downtown area and West Campus).


Traffic impact is the major concern of property owners. As recounted in the previous article, one business owner, Bat City Awards and Apparel owner Trey Bueché, worries that his new business at 18th and Nueces will be threatened if auto traffic is discouraged and argued that the area between 15th and MLK is "primarily a commercial district." Bueché is partly right: The property there is heavily commercial, and the plan would discourage autos. But it's important to note the type of commercial: The only retail I spotted on my own survey of the four-block stretch was (not counting the Jimmy John's sandwich shop and Taco Cabana facing MLK) Bat City, Tiff's Treats (a cookie bakery), and a salon. Otherwise, as Beaudet said, the businesses tend to be law firms and other "appointment-oriented" businesses, adding, "This is not a retail corridor in any way."


Property owner Susan Harris asserts that that same segment of Nueces is ripe for exactly the type of high-rise redevelopment sought by the city to increase Downtown population density, because it's one of the few areas not in a Capitol view corridor – and she believes that restricting auto traffic will discourage this development.

The League of Bicycling Voters, in its very detailed plan for the corridor (**www.lobv**. **org/2010/01/nueces**), counters that developers understand that Downtown Austinites desire multimodal transportation, including bikes, and that in any case, such future development is speculative: "City planners also note that cur-

Note: This is not the city of Austin's plan for a Nueces bike boulevard. It is a design being promoted by the League of Bicycling Voters and is offered here to illustrate what such a boulevard might look like. These captions detail some of the traffic-calming devices that might be used to force motorist deference to cyclists.

Raised crosswalks: Much like speed humps, they would prevent cars from rolling through stop signs, hopefully protecting not only pedestrians but cyclists as well. rent zoning does not provide for any significant 'high-rise' or intense residential development on a large scale." Beaudet said that preserving on-street parking is "a priority."

Other criticisms raised are that public safety will be endangered and that fire, police, and the Travis County Sheriff's Office are opposed. The city's official line is that the Austin Police Department and the Austin Fire Department are on board with the proposal as long as access for emergency services is not hampered. As for the TCSO, property owner Scott Sayers said at the January meeting that he was aware of a letter from Sheriff Greg Hamilton to APD Chief Art Acevedo opposing the boulevard for fear of potential effects on the inloading of suspects at the Travis County Jail – part of the Downtown criminal justice center for which Nueces acts as the western border.

That's only partially right. Hamilton showed me the letter and said he simply has "concerns" – some of which had been based on inaccurate information. Hamilton based his letter on a *Statesman* story that said traffic-blocking bollards might be part of the traffic-calming mix, which Baudet flatly denies. He also believed that part of the proposal is to make Nueces one-way (it's not). However, it is true that the project seeks to "slow down or impede vehicular traffic."

Partial diverters: At four busy avenues in the

plan (Fifth, Sixth, 12th, and 15th streets), LOBV recommends auto traffic be prevented from

turning onto Nueces, while bicycles be allowed



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#### **Rio Not-So-Grande**

It's hard to guess how much of the LOBV plan might make it into the final product. Negotiations over the Lance Armstrong Bikeway a few years ago left it as something less than the smooth, contiguous ride across Downtown that bike advocates had hoped for, and compromises could produce similar results here. Assertions by the LOBV (and the city) that the boulevard would actually increase property values and attract more business are hard to quantify beyond the anecdotal, as no truly solid studies exist. (But then, the same could be said of claims that it will kill businesses.)

On other claims, though, this reporter at least partially agrees with LOBV's assertion that "Rio Grande is not a viable option." It might be viable, but it's definitely the poorer choice. I retract a claim in my earlier story that Rio Grande's incline "is not much more severe than Nueces" – after taking a reride, I'd say it's not much more severe for me, but if attracting cyclists of all ages and abilities is a major goal, then Rio Grande could certainly pose a significant challenge for your average 7-year-old or older folks unaccustomed to higher grades.

#### "Why can't we have just one [street] to bike on?" - Bike forum participant

One argument made in favor of Rio Grande is that it directly connects across MLK, which Nueces does not. However, the recent addition of bike lanes on MLK makes that transition a lot simpler, and besides, Rio Grande's direct connection only applies to northbound traffic.

On the south end, the argument tilts toward Nueces because it has almost a direct connection to the Lance Armstrong Bikeway bridge over Shoal Creek (one need only turn right on Third Street, and there you are). A connection from Rio Grande would either require another bridge over Shoal Creek (expensive and thus unlikely) or signage directing bikers around the Fourth/Nueces/Third block to the existing bridge. Simpler is better.

I'd also agree with the LOBV's rejection of arguments that there is something wrong with giving preference to the bicycle, as if it would be some sort of discrimination. "We find this stance rather absurd, since the vast majority of streets and developments overall already are planned to give preference to the automobile," reads the report. Or, as one woman at the January meeting put it: "You have all the other streets to drive on. Why can't we have just one to bike on?"

The city's final meeting to discuss the boulevard will be held on Feb. 24, and like the previous meetings, at Pease Elementary, at 6pm.



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## **'SPACESHIP AUSTIN DOWNTOWN CRUISERS'**

#### Austin in the sky, checkpoint down below

A pair of large alien spacecraft are hovering above the concourse at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport right this minute. Alien, because they don't look like a space shuttle or an Apollo or a Soyuz or any of the space-going shapes we're familiar with from real life. On the other hand, not alien at all, because they're built from sculpted images of this city's own burgeoning skyline(!) and because they're easily recognizable from our pop-cultural history of sci-fi cinema.

"Oh, wow," John Q. Public likely thinks instantly upon noticing the first of the objects, "that's a goddamn spaceship."

South Korean artist (and University of Texas grad) Young-Min Kang is the man responsible for this wonderment, having been commissioned by Austin's Art in Public Places program to provide his as-usual spectacular creations for display in that gateway to the skies. Each spaceship is 18 feet by 12 feet and weighs 600 pounds. The skyline depicted - via photos reproduced on 126 individually cut and shaped tiles - is the same for each sculpture, but one is a daytime view and the other is of night; both immensities were fabricated by a team at Imagecraft Exhibits, working for hours, for days, to embiggen the parameters of an artist's much smaller model.

This invoking of the familiar-within-the-alien-within-thefamiliar isn't an unusual trope for Kang. As he said in a Chronicle interview (see "Facing the Media," March 25, 2005): "When I was in Korea, I was watching all the Hollywood movies, so I had a certain kind of imagination about Americans and American culture. And I'm not sure if ... I really liked it or it was more just curiosity. But when I got here, my image of it was broken, and I had to totally rebuild my idea of America."

And now here's the major visual impact of our city rebuilt as vessels – Spaceship Austin Downtown Cruisers - designed to go where no one, except in imagination, has gone before. Of course, in some fantasies, it's the aliens that come to this planet in their long-voyaging spacecraft and wind up, as in the recent thriller District 9, in government-restricted ghettos, right? We mention this, even beyond any potential subtext of South Korean/American politics, as ironically apropos - because Kang's newest public artworks are located past security checkpoints and thus available to - Wayne Alan Brenner ticketed passengers only.

## **MICHAEL MOGAVERO**

#### A double seduction

When it comes to the making of art, painter Michael Mogavero cares about only one thing: the work itself. He was in the middle of the 1980s New York City art boom, living downtown, exhibiting at the prestigious Holly Solomon gallery, and witnessing just how much the art world was concerned about anything but the art itself. Eventually, he made his way to Austin, where he has continued steadily painting year after year. His solo exhibition "Interludes," currently at the East Austin alternative space Pump Project Art Complex, is a testament to his conviction. Mogavero cares very little about prestige or hype. He chose this offbeat exhibition space as it best serves to view this new body of work.

There is a lineage as the nature of art is operational. It doesn't happen in a vacuum.

AC: Is the subject matter the primary motivator? **MM:** Ultimately, it's an excuse to make pictures, and as an artist, you want that excuse to be meaningful. Look at the work of Philip Guston. To him, he was still making abstract pictures, except they just happen to have a bald guy in it, with a cigarette, in front of his studio light bulb. It's important that your content is compelling enough to you to give you the motivation and time it takes to make the work. Even though the strength and the power of the work comes from the artist's self and from the internal workings - psychological, emotional – it has to have linger power.

AC: You have always worked in series. When is it time to move on? MM: The work comes from a seed moment, and one has to see it through the development. I feel like I could work on this series, "Interludes," for the rest of my life, which I won't. You know it instinctively, when it is time to wind it down. Usually, it is because something else caught your inquisitive eye; something else is tugging at you. You find the right moment to make that transition.

My transitions have always been incremental rather than monumental.


## **BLANTON MUSEUM OF ART**

There's an explosion of color inside the big white 100-yearold house one block east of I-35 on Third Street. The house is the studio of Helmut Barnett, artist of large abstract paintings, of smaller abstract drawings. The explosion of color is his many works rendered on stretched canvas and fine thick paper: posed on easels, stacked in corners, hung on walls, piled upon tables, stashed in drawer after drawer of several wooden cabinets.

He's a busy man, this Barnett. He's currently preparing work for his fourth one-man show – appropriately titled "Big Paintings, Little Drawings" – at Wally Workman Gallery, and he has a warehouse worth of brilliance after almost four decades of pursuing his art.

"I've been in Austin a long time," says Barnett, "and I've been very lucky with studios. I had a studio on Congress Avenue for 28 years. That was 908 Congress, the same block that Little City is in now, and I was there from '74 to 2002. And before that I had a place on Sixth Street, upstairs from where the parkside restaurant is now."

Barnett's personal history is captured on the tall refurbished walls of the former residence that he's occupied for eight years now, cherished images marking the passage of time, framed among a spectacular array of paintings and drawings: photos of the band he played guitar with as a young man in Germany, of the plane he flew in as a radar technician for the United States Air Force, of his old studio on Congress, of Barnett and his wife on a date in the restaurant – the Avenue – below that old studio, of the couple's daughter, who's now attending Texas A&M.

History, arranged upon the verticals like the diversity of shapes in Barnett's biggest works. History, but nothing near the current studio's own century mark, right? Even though there has to be a substantial number of years to account for the skills the man has acquired, the finesse with which he brings his polychrome wonders into being.

"I'm going to be 64," says the artist, running a hand back through the thick brush of gray hair atop his head. "I don't feel 64."

Barnett uses whatever's necessary (but mostly acrylic paint) to translate his visions from internal to external, and the results are often stunning. Not in abstracts like abstract expressionism's more emo slashes and splotches that pretty much assault a defenseless surface, but *strategically applied, complexly balanced* abstracts. Like Mies van der Rohe tweaking the color schemes of lepidoptera. Like Joan Miró and Piet Mondrian collaborating at the peak of a Ritalin binge. Like no one does quite the way Helmut Barnett does.

"I like to draw a lot," says Barnett, gesturing toward a small outcropping of sketchbooks on one table. "I like black-andwhite drawings, pencil drawings. The drawing is very spon-

taneous and quick, and there's a bit of playfulness involved – sometimes I'll start drawing with my left hand, just to get different shapes. And I do put some recognizable things in the abstracts, if they show up. But I don't intend to; I don't know what they're going to look like beforehand. This painting here, for instance, this shape started out as just a black blob, and I made it look more like a bust. It's called *Bad Boy Bust.*" He chuckles. "I like alliteration in some of my titles.

"So, yes, sometimes I *do* work the shapes out: I see something I like, and I develop it a bit, kind of refine it. And usually the drawings stay the same size; but, lately, what I've been doing for my paintings ... I'll make little sketches – I have books that I fill with drawings – and when I do one that I like, I go out here and put

on my overhead projector and project the image onto a canvas. And that way it comes out much larger but with exact proportions. And I'll paint it that way. This," he says, walking over to an unfinished piece on an easel, "is one I'm working on now, for the new show."

So amazing, the subtle gradations of color, that it has to be asked: He doesn't use an airbrush, does he?

"No, I don't," says Barnett. "I tried an airbrush, years ago, but I didn't like it. I found it ... too mechanical. This is just

done very carefully – with a lot of taping. I use a lot of masking tape, and I do a lot of layering with a brush and just blend the colors together. I use a large brush, and I work very fast. I have to, because the paint dries so fast. It's acrylics – it's not oils. Large areas are really hard to do."

And yet look at how one color smooths into the next; see the barely discernible strokes of sable or camel hair or whatever pulled the pigment. Never mind, even, the overall visual impact; just, ah, groove on the skill of application. It's so wonderfully ... controlled.

"Well, you could look at it like that," says Barnett, smiling, seeming a shade uncomfortable with the compliments. "You *could* look at it like that – in a positive way. Or you could look at it in a negative way." He shrugs. "Maybe it's too *tight*."

As if providing evidence of his efforts in combating such putative tightness, Barnett points to another work on the other side of the room. "That's some of the masking tape I used," he says. "I cut it into pieces and glued it on there, just kind of messed around with it." Look: Short lines of textured color form a staggered spectrum in many rows across a large rectangle. Beautiful. And slightly reminiscent of something Lance Letscher might create.

"Ah," says Barnett, "I know Lance. What I do that's more like what Lance does, I paint on the collages I make. I take books – physics books, chemistry books, mechanical drawing books – because I like the little shapes in there – and I play with the shapes that are in there, cut them up, extend them into drawings, and paint over them. I make the collages at home: That's where I glue them together. My wife doesn't like me using the dining-room table, but that's where I do it. And then I bring them here for painting."

And over here, on a pair of paintings halfway up one of the walls, what technique produced the strangely modulated gray tones in the background?

"That's a solvent transfer," explains Barnett. "What I do, I take pages from magazines and put them in a cookie tray that's filled with lacquer thinner. The lacquer thinner loosens the ink, and if you pick the page up – real quick – and put it

on here, then it transfers, and sometimes – see? – you can even pick up a pattern. And I like working in black and white, but most of the things I sell, well, people like *color*. And so here, on top of the transfers, I did a whole series on what, for lack of a better term, I call ribbons."

And over *there* is another series, based on other notebook sketches. And over *there* are variations on red waveforms. And over *there* are what appear to be giant silhouettes of complex beadwork. And over *there* is – holy Yves Tanguy, is this amount of work what it takes to make a living as a painter? What about when Barnett was first starting out, after the USAF, after graduating from UT with a bachelor's of fine arts back in '74?

"In the very beginning, I wasn't making a living from my art." he says. "I had to take part-time jobs.

But I wasn't married then, and I didn't want to take a fulltime job, because I felt – and I felt real strong about this – I didn't want to get comfortable with a regular paycheck and slowly delegate my painting to weekends. And, being single, I was able to go ahead and just take care of myself; I really didn't need a lot of money. So, because of the good graces of my landlord, I was able to work. Plus, I had a friend in the restaurant below; I would work in the original Waterloo [Ice CONTINUED ON P.34



House], get a free lunch and a little extra money. So I got by. And these days ... well, it's still not easy."

Barnett looks around the spacious studio, at the high ceiling that had to be rescued (with a car jack and several 2-by-8s) from sagging, at the formerly graffiti-covered walls now showing white between the dozens and dozens of paintings and drawings and collages and framed photos, at a growing body of work that another artist might sacrifice his left arm to have created. "I mean," he says, a wry smile collaging itself into the contours of his face, "I can come here and make art all day long, but I can't make anybody buy it."

Many people, however, do. And you can, too, of course; or, at least, you can see the newest works – an orchestrated explosion of color and form and techniques – on display at Wally Workman Gallery throughout the month of February at *this* particular point in history.


#### **PLANISPHERE: NEW POEMS** by John Ashbery HarperCollins, 160 pp., \$24.99

#### **IN THE PRESENCE OF THE SUN: STORIES AND POEMS**, 1961-1991 by N. Scott Momaday **University of New Mexico Press,** 143 pp. \$18.95 (paper)

Two recently published collections from two celebrated elder statesmen among American writers – New York poet John Ashbery and New Mexico poet N. Scott Momaday - offer two vastly different perspectives on life. Yet, read together, the books carry similar celestial themes, with each poet drawing on his own life experiences, from the worldly to the world-wearv.

Ashbery's poems can be frustrating. Many people agree on that point. But rather than trying to understand them, poet and Slate columnist Meghan O'Rourke advised a few years ago, "take pleasure from their arrangement, the way you listen to music. It's only then, for most readers, that the meaning begins to leak through." Perhaps the meaning may still be lost on the reader, but who cares? Sit back and delight in the tempo of Ashbery's words, the harmony of his voice - pretty, witty, and sweet. Who could not appreciate such vivid imagery as, "The land stretched away like jelly into a confused cleft"? In his new orinu book, Planisphere, dedicated to his longtime companion David Kermani, Ashbery provides a fresh bouquet of poems, the titles of each one cleverly sorted in alphabetical order, from "Alcove" to "Zymurgy." Indeed, the poems run the gamut of topics and emotions, literally from A to Z. While Ashbery's many scholarly accomplishments in his long life have earned him plenty of lofty accolades, this writer in residence at Bard is hardly a stuffy academic. Imagine Ashbery sitting at a typewriter in his pajamas, wearing a playful grin, pounding out passages for the sheer fun of it. The poem "He Who Loves and Runs Away" draws a chuckle: "The bad news is the ship hasn't arrived:/ the good news is it hasn't left yet./It is still being loaded by natives with cone-shaped/ hats on their heads." Unless you're looking for true meaning, few poems from this collection fall flat - provided they are read with an appreciation for good music and wry

humor: "Don't hold your breath but/hold me responsible/for what happens after that./lf he hollers just keep walking/passively, hand with/peashooter in pocket." Peashooter in pocket. What rhythm.

Momaday's In the Presence of the Sun is a reprint edition of a 1992 collection of work spanning 30 years of prose, poetry, and drawings. The reissue is a blessing of sorts, a celebration on two fronts: the American Indian voice in contemporary literature and the versatility of Momaday's ability to steadily produce over a period of several decades. In the preface, Momaday explains how he came to work in so many different forms. "When I knew what it was to write a poem, I wanted to know what it was to write a novel. then a travel piece, then a film script, then a

play. When I had found my way with charcoal and graphite. I went to watercolor and acrylics, to oils, to printmaking." Yet he calls himself a "productive artist, not a prolific one ...." While he received a Pulitzer Prize for fiction for his first novel, House Made of Dawn, the Santa Fe resident of Kiowa heri-

tage considers himself a poet first. Clearly, his poems in this reprint collection bear out his claim.

The book is laid out in sections - selected poems occupy the first 39 pages, followed by a fictional account of the life of Billy the Kid, followed by "The Story of a Well-Made Shield." The final leg of the book returns us, thankfully, to his poems.

A couple of favorites: "Comparatives," for its salt-of-the-earth sensibilities in the final lines: "It is most like/wind on waves - mere commotion./mute and mean./perceptible -/ that is all"; and "Buteo Regalis" for its language: "His frailty discrete, the rodent turns, looks./What sense first warns? The winging is unheard./Unseen but as distant motion made whole,/Singular, slow, unbroken in its glide.' - Amy Smith





# **King Cakes**

There are more king cakes available in Austin this year than ever before. Is it the post-Katrina Mardi Gras diaspora that spread this delicious culinary component of the Crescent City's favorite holiday celebration? Whatever the reason for the trend, Bakerman's Patisserie and Chocolatier owner and New Orleans native Hope Arabie is glad to see it. "I love making king cakes, and I'm happy that more people are ordering them every year. It makes Austin feel more like home," she told me last week. In New Orleans, king cakes are a regular feature of the carnival season, showing up for the Feast of the Epiphany (Jan. 6, the 12th day of Christmas) and holding a place of honor at parties and celebrations through Mardi Gras, the Tuesday before Lent begins. The brightly decorated crowns of sweetened yeast dough have a baby (representing the Christ child), a bean, or a coin baked into the dough, and the person who finds the treasure in his or her slice is responsible for providing the king cake at the next party. Though Austin doesn't celebrate the entire carnival season as yet, king cakes are growing in popularity and can be purchased at the following local businesses with 24 hours notice.

Bakerman's Patisserie and Chocolatier (120 E. Seventh, 476-0060) Hope Arabie's cakes are lovely and delicious, filled with a choice of traditional cinnamon sugar or cream cheese, napped with frosting dusted with bright-green, purple, and gold sanding sugar and plenty of Mardi Gras beads. Half-sheet, \$13; full sheet, \$27.

# Sweetish Hill Bakery

(1120 W. Sixth, 472-1347) Austin's oldest French bakery is preparing both the traditional French galette des rois with almond-paste filling and the New Orleans-style sweet yeast dough filled with cinnamon sugar.

went. "If I was in Minnesota or Kansas or Florida during carnival season, I'd order beads and hand them out.

"Beads are power," Uhler asserts. "It really is the currency of Mardi Gras – on both sides of the equation. Whether you want to spank some little college-aged boy's bottom," he turns to wife Katie and grins (she rolls her eyes), "or you want to be the one who gets spanked."

Twenty years after his first Mardi Gras, Uhler founded Austin's Krewe of Utopia. Their ball has become an annual tradition, now held at Maggie Mae's. "The club loves it because we're the only place in town that throws free beads." And this year, they aim to toss more than 200,000 strands. "I don't think our smallest bead is what they hand out in most places. Then again, I am a little competitive," he beams.

"I want to grow this beyond our krewe. I envision other krewes taking over other places like we did with Maggie Mae's and invigorating the economy, making Downtown a huge Mardi Gras destination. Just think of the money involved in that. There's the events, the catering, the tuxes, the costumes, and of course, the beads."

Sounds pretty sane to us. - Kate X Messer

The coolest Super Bowl party food idea I've seen so far this season has to be the cake stadium filled with cake balls decorated as Saints and Colts helmets! The folks at Austin Cake Ball (7950 Anderson Square #104, 826-4824, www.austincakeball.com) will whip one up in the flavors of your choice and deliver it to your Super Bowl party. So far, my favorite local Valentine's treat is the fabulous selection of handdecorated cookies at Quack's 43rd Street Bakery (411 E. 43rd, 453-3399, www.quacksbakery.com), especially the skunk inscribed with "Love stinks." If a romantic evening at home sounds like the best Valentine's Day celebration option, the chefs at Central Market are ready to help. Order from several custom "dinner for two" menus complete with candles, brioche rolls, dessert, and a romanticcomedy DVD packed in a lovely gift bag. Dinners range in price from \$50 to \$80, and the deadline to order from either store's catering desk (Lamar, 206-1024; Westgate, 899-4343) is 4pm Feb. 12... Readers have really been burning up the e-mail with news of restaurant closures the past week. One distressed reader told of how evening shift employees at the Alligator Grill (3003 S. Lamar) were surprised to find the restaurant closed when they showed up for work one day last week, but general manager Paul Blandford assured us he had made every effort to contact his employees before the abrupt closure and said he would do whatever he could to help them find other jobs. He explained that owner Steve Wimberly had evaluated the 14-year-old restaurant's profitability relative to fresh seafood costs and rent increases and made the difficult decision to close. Wimberly's other businesses Downtown, Gumbo's Louisiana Style Cafe and the Brown Bar, remain open. Farther north in the Rosedale neighborhood, some Brazilian soccer fans alerted us to the demise of Sampaio's Brazilian Cuisine (4800 Burnet Rd.). The Brazilian restaurant closed quietly earlier this month, but Brazilian food lovers can still find the cuisine of their homeland in the UT campus area at São Paulo's (2809 San Jacinto, 473-9988, www.saopaulos.net). We also got news about a new Bavarian restaurant near Briarcliff called Ilsa's Kitchen (20700 Hwy. 71 W., 494-4270, www.ilsaskitchen.com), where longtime Austin chef Achim "Chef Keem" Thiemermann is running the kitchen. Its beer and wine license is still pending, so BYOB to enjoy with the German/Bavarian menu and the live oompah music... If you've yet to purchase Girl Scout cookies this year, be advised the entrepreneurial young ladies will be selling at local Simon malls - the Arboretum, both the Shops at Arbor Walk and the Shops at Arbor Trails, the Domain, Gateway Shopping Center, and Wolf Ranch Town Center - between now and Feb. 28... School gardens offer more than just fun or fresh herbs and produce for the cafeteria; they can also provide curriculum enrichment in a variety of disciplines. Teachers, administrators, and parents have a great opportunity to learn more about incorporating gardens and nature areas into their school curricula at the Get Growing & Keep Going conference at Garza Independence High School (1600 Chicon) from 8am to 4pm on Saturday, Feb. 6. # Sons of Austin

Murph and Ben Willcott develop a new paradigm for the next generation of a beloved family business

Watching Talia and Lucy Willcott scamper across the Texas French Bread parking lot to enjoy the playscape installed by their father and uncles reinforces my idea that this is essentially a story about family. The bakery was founded by the girls' grandparents Judy and Paul Willcott and is now run by their father, Ben, 40, and their uncle Murph, 48. Children of a linguistics professor, the Willcott brothers grew up around their mom's bakery, a business that evolved from Judy Willcott's love for classic French cooking and her habit of making rustic country breads and sharing them with friends. Judy opened the first Texas French Bread retail location at 34th and Guadalupe in 1981, back when Austin rents were famously cheap (\$300!), salaries were low, and shops offering French bread, pastries, and excellent coffee were rare in the University of Texas campus area.

The original Texas French Bread was part of a 10-year Austin culinary renaissance that included the opening of Anderson & Company Coffee, Sweetish Hill Bakery, Jeffrey's, Fonda San Miguel, Basil's, Chez Fred, and Whole Foods Market. The young business flourished, and after her divorce, Judy began to expand. All of the branch spaces were rented, except for the 1939-vintage neighborhood grocery building at the corner of 29th and Rio Grande that had achieved Seventies music-venue icon status as the Rome Inn. Judy bought the building over the protest of advisers in 1985, not realizing the purchase would ultimately provide the secure foundation for the next generation of the family business. The spread of the neighborhood locations was based on customer demand and affordable real estate. By 1995, there were country baguettes, Hobbit Bread, Hyde Park Fudge Cakes, sandwiches, and coffee in 11 Texas French Bread outlets around the city.

But that 1995 version of Austin was changing rapidly. Homegrown Whole Foods had gone national in a big way, and H-E-B had chosen Austin to debut its new Central Market concept - both featured big, in-house bakery operations. Starbucks had arrived, and local neighborhood coffee shops, carts, and kiosks were also blossoming, especially in the UT campus area. And perhaps most significantly, the local dot-com bubble began to enlarge, bringing with it national attention, job growth, career diversification, a higher standard of living, and real estate speculation. Even though that bubble burst during the decade from 1995 to 2005, rents and salaries continued to climb, but the retail prices of a baguette, a sandwich, or a slice of cake had limits. Murph Willcott provides an example, explaining that "when Judy signed the lease on the South Congress space in 1992, the rent was \$1,500 and there wasn't any competition in the neighborhood. The last time the lease was up for renewal, they were talking \$5,000/triple net, and there were pastries, coffee, and sandwiches for sale everywhere you looked up and down the street. The price of a baguette started at \$1.25 and went up to \$2. It just didn't make sense for us to pay the higher rent for a diminishing return." Murph and Ben Willcott took over in 2001, guiding the company through a Chapter 11 bankruptcy filing that closed several stores but saving the core business. In fall 2009, they closed the last two satellite outlets and consolidated the entire enterprise in the building Judy had wisely purchased in the Eighties. The brothers have spent the past couple of years figuring out how to put their personal stamp on the next generation of the family business, using Judy's bread, the staff of life, as a foundation and springboard.

Though all three Willcott brothers spent time working at Texas French Bread growing up, Murph and Ben took differing routes away

from and back to Austin. (Youngest brother Matthew "Teo" Willcott managed his share of Texas French Bread outlets but has been working for Apple for several years now.) Murph followed a UT Plan II degree with one from Harvard Law School ('93, where his studies overlapped with Barack Obama), but he worked in high-profile New York restaurants before, during, and after college. He went on to work for large law firms in both New York and California but says now, "I kept looking for that 'fun' legal career and just never found it." Murph's current job does not require a suit and tie. Ben attended college on both coasts before finishing an English degree at UT and worked at restaurants in both New York City and San Francisco during his studies. He then parlayed his English degree into a job teaching English as a second language in Taiwan and traveled extensively in Southeast Asia, India, and even South Africa. "The chance to experience food from the various regions of China in Taiwan, getting to shop the markets all over Thailand, it was all so amazing, an inspiration," he recalls. After his return to Austin, Ben freelanced for The Austin Chronicle's Arts section and worked for Dell before joining the family firm.

Once the brothers took over from Judy, the next step was to develop a business model that would reflect their tastes and interests while maintaining the loyal, established Texas French Bread customer base. "What it came down to was deciding what we could do that would be fun for us, that would also attract new customers to the store," Murph explains. Ben had often lobbied for a restaurant but is quick to point out that "we didn't want to come up with a business plan, borrow a bunch of money, and open up some corporate theme park. We decided to take a more homegrown, organic approach." About two years ago, they started hosting experimental supper club events with menus based on local meats, cheeses, dairy products, and organic produce, paired with bread and desserts from the bakery. "It's really simple, humble food based on quality ingredients, very much inspired by French country cooking but adapted to our local climate and growing seasons," Ben says.

The response to the supper clubs was so encouraging, the brothers began to serve dinner at the bakery a few nights a week with minimal adjustments to the space: simple changes in lighting, long cafe curtains made from Home Depot drop cloths, soft music, and votive candles on the tables. Voilà, you've got yourself a neighborhood bistro! Once again, the Willcotts used a homegrown, Austintatious approach to the project. All the marketing consists of very personal weekly e-mails from Murph describing how the results of Ben's market shopping excursions will show up on the menu. (These are fun to read whether you make it in to the restaurant or not.) They have a kids' menu and added the aforementioned family-friendly playscape and outdoor dining area to attract more families to dine early on Wednesday evenings, when the weather permits. And in true Austin fashion, they offer live musical performances. Dinner guests have enjoyed the cabaret stylings of Kara Bliss, Twenties and Thirties klezmer tunes from Bruce Salmon's the Inheritance, and Tango Tuesdays when maestro Glover Johns Gill provides skilled piano accompaniment to enthusiastic tango dancers on the family grand piano, on loan from Judy's house around the corner.

Both brothers admit the nighttime bistro is still very much a work in progress. "We want to keep it small, local, sustainable, and responsible," Ben explains. One of Murph's most important goals is to present a menu in both the bakery and the restaurant that's at least 75% locally sourced, and he's making serious progress toward that goal. Inspired by the works of Michael Pollan, Murph is also doing his best to weed out products containing antibiotics and growth hormones, and he would love to get rid of everything containing genetically modified organisms (the GMOs in corn

and soy products), but that's currently a very tall order. Long-range plans call for obtaining a beer and wine license for the bistro, but compliance with Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission regulations will require some improvements to the 71-year-old building that are currently not in the budget. Until there's a permit in place, the bistro charges a nominal corkage fee, and many guests enjoy

being able to peruse the menu online and bring their own wine selections.

Meanwhile, Murph and Ben are proud of their relationships with area farmers and ranchers, listing suppliers' names on the changing weekly menus. There's chicken from Dewberry Hills Farms; produce from Boggy Creek Farm, Angel Valley Organic Farm, Gundermann's Farm, Harvest Time Farm, and Amador Farms;

lamb from Loncito; occasionally bison from Thunder Heart; beef from Bastrop Cattle Company; pork from Burgundy Pastures; and fresh fish from another old Austin family business, Quality Seafood Market. They also buy from John Lash's local foraging operation, Farm to Table, from time to time. Ben shops all the farmers' markets every week, letting the seasonal produce direct his menu selections and inspire his cooking. This is not some outfit that buys a handful of local produce every week and jumps on the "farm-to-table" bandwagon because it's a trendy marketing tool. The proof here is on the plate. The food is not particularly sophisticated, but it has heart, and it's made with love and pride. What could be more exquisite than a lightly dressed salad lyonnaise made with Boggy

Creek greens; crisp lar-



# DANCE, GIRL, DANCE

It was a good year for women filmmakers at a recharged Sundance Film Festival

The 2010 edition of the Sundance Film Festival, which took place Jan. 21-31 in Park City, Utah, showed signs of trying to change the overall direction of the event. The festival organizers are leading the charge into the future by encouraging a return to independent filmmaking's past. Using the opportunity afforded by the changeover of festival leadership during the past year (longtime Director Geoff Gilmore left last year for Tribeca Enterprises, which owns and operates the Tribeca Film Festival, and his underling, John Cooper, is the new chief), the organizers heralded a return to their roots at every opportunity. The prefix "re-" marked the overall theme of the festival. The letters were seen on the tote bags and program books, as well as on all festival screens. Also appearing in a loop on every auditorium screen prior to the start of each film were the following sentences: "This is cinematic rebellion. This is the renewed rebellion. This is the recharged fight against the establishment of the expected. This is the rebirth of the battle for brave new ideas. This is Sundance reminded."

The constant repetition of these sentences was meant to remind attendees at America's leading showcase of independent filmmaking that we can no longer conduct business as usual. Technological developments, along with the overall economic tenor of the times, are forcing film purveyors and consumers to rethink all aspects of the industry. Old distribution networks and models are failing, as more and more studios shutter their specialty distribution arms (R.I.P. Miramax, Warner Independent Pictures, Picturehouse, et al.) and the online digi-

tal distribution of films becomes a growing reality. And now that almost every self-respecting city in America hosts some sort of film festival, the festival circuit itself has grown into a legitimate, if labor-intensive, means of getting one's film seen throughout the country. Plus, new video-on-demand models and coordinated day-and-date festival and theatrical releases are changing the conventional paradigms.

The Sundance programmers also appear to be proactively shifting their

focus away from star-driven, low-budget indies to artier projects with less luminous star wattage. There definitely seemed to be a reduced celebrity quotient at this year's festival, and the herds of hangers-on and entourages also appear to be thinning. (The streets of the small resort town were much easier to negotiate than in other recent years, and after the opening weekend when many industryites start heading back to the city, the cell phone airwaves even cleared up enough to deliver instant on-demand service.) Another sign of the programmers' attempt to reboot the predictability of their offerings is the establishment of a new sidebar titled Next, which is devoted to microbudget films.

I don't yet know if this was part of the programming plan, a happy convergence of events, or truly emblematic of the current state of independent filmmaking, but a great number of the festival's films were made by women. And among these women-directed films were some of the festival's best offerings. My favorite film of this year's Sundance was *The Kids Are All Right* by Lisa Cholodenko (*High Art, Laurel Canyon*). Starring Annette Bening and Julianne Moore as a middle-aged lesbian couple, the film examines what happens within their family when their two teenage children seek out their biological father (played by Mark Ruffalo). The performances are uniformly superb, with Benning and Moore making their characters' two-decades-long marriage and home life seem believable and true, and the dialogue and nuances of Cholodenko's screenplay have the feel of real life. To date, the \$5 million sale of *The Kids Are All Right* to Focus Features marks the biggest sale

of the 2010 festival. (Also notable, however, is that this purchase price is half what the festival's hottest films sold for just a couple years ago. Presumably, distributors are wary of repeating the profligate mistakes they made by paying \$10 million fees for such films as 2008's *Hamlet 2*, which garnered only a tiny fraction of that outlay at the box office.)


The festival's double prizewinner was Debra Granik's *Winter's Bone*, which took home the Dramatic Grand Jury Prize, as well as the Waldo Salt Screenwriting Award. In 2004, Granik brought Vera Farmiga to world attention with the actress' riveting performance as a junkie who has every intention of quitting in the similarly titled *Down to the Bone*. Granik's eye for talent strikes again with newcomer Jennifer Lawrence's rich and moving performance as the central figure in the Ozarks-set *Winter's Bone*, a location-drenched back-woods story about family connections and economic realities.

Yet most indicative of the unrestrained presence of female sensibilities were the opening shots of two festival entries: *The Runaways* and *Please Give.* Floria Sigismondi's narrative film about the meteoric rise of the punk girl group the Runaways and the band's lead performers Joan Jett and Cherie Currie (played by Kristen Stewart and Dakota Fanning) starts with a splat of menstrual blood hitting the pavement. The opening sequence of *Please Give* by Nicole Holofcener

(*Walking and Talking, Friends With Money*) is a montage of different female breasts plopping onto the screening plate of a mammogram machine while a radiologist, who is one of the film's lead characters, goes about her business of arranging the breasts for best X-ray visioning. These are most definitely sights I have never witnessed on a movie screen.

As for the local angle, Austin was particularly well-represented in this year's edition of Sundance. Bryan Poyser's Lovers of Hate was selected to screen in one of 16 slots in the festival's dramatic competition. Amy Grappell's short film "Quadrangle" took home an honorable mention. They were joined in Park City by several other alumni of the Texas Filmmakers' Production Fund: Ryan Piers Williams, whose feature The Dry Land screened in the Dramatic Competition; Sundance regulars David and Nathan Zellner, with the short "Fiddlestixx"; and Dallas native Clay Liford, with the short "My Mom Smokes Weed." Former Austin filmmakers also screening at the festival included Anthony Burns with the feature Skateland and Mark and Jay Duplass with the very funny comedy Cyrus, which stars John C. Reilly, Marisa Tomei, and Jonah Hill. With such a terrific array of work coming out of Texas, the question "Why leave home to see it?" becomes a valid point to raise.





# SXSW FILM ANNOUNCES FEATURE LINEUP

# 'MacGruber,' 'Mr. Nice,' 'Micmacs' among titles

When South by Southwest went live with its feature film lineup at 12:01 this morning, it threw a lot of numbers out there fast: "Over the course of nine days, 119 features will screen at the festival, with 55 of those having their world premieres at SXSW 2010," read the press release. "These films were selected from a record 1,572 feature-length film submissions composed of 1,206 U.S. and 366 international feature-length films."

Among those 119 features will be some highly anticipated world premieres, including the *Saturday Night Live* sketch-to-screen *MacGruber* starring Will Forte; *Hoop Dreams*' director Steve James' documentary No *Crossover: The Trial of Allen Iverson*; British filmmaker Bernard Rose's narrative feature *Mr. Nice*, about real-life drug smuggler Howard Marks; and Aaron Katz's follow-up to *Quiet City, Cold Weather*. Notable U.S. premieres include Jean-Pierre Jeunet's *Micmacs* and Shane Meadows' *Le Donk & Scor-zay-zee* (co-starring the Arctic Monkeys). Additionally, Sundance titles like the Duplass Brothers' *Cyrus*, Debra Granik's award-winning *Winter's Bone*, Floria Sigismondi's *The Runaways*, and Austinite Bryan Poyser's *Lovers of Hate* will screen at SXSW Film, which runs March 12-20 this year.

Speaking of local, Texas filmmakers were well-represented throughout the lineup. In the feature competition slate, Dallas filmmaker Clay Liford, fresh off his Park City appearance with short "My Mom Smokes Weed," will premiere his narrative feature *Earthling*, while Austin's Mike Dolan will compete with *Dance With the One*, a project that came out of the University of Texas Film Institute's Feature Film Lab (see "Of Strip Clubs and Hash Stashes," Screens, Aug. 1, 2008). Other local filmmakers screening at SXSW include Paul Gordon, with *The Happy Poet*, and Geoff Marslett, with his long-gestating sci-fi animated romantic comedy (with Kinky Friedman!), *Mars*.

Favorite sidebars like the music-related 24 Beats Per Second (boasting the world premiere of doc *Strange Powers: Stephin Merritt and the Magnetic Fields*) and SX Fantastic (midnighters programmed by the folks at Fantastic Fest) are back, while special events include the screening of three classic films accompanied with a live score, including Dreyer's *The Passion of Joan of Arc*.

# **History in the Making** A new exhibit at the Harry Ransom Center proves that no job is too small when it comes to 'Making Movies'

"Dear Bobby. You like my letters? Here's another."

So wrote Elia Kazan to Robert De Niro in a letter on the subject of *The Last Tycoon*, the pair's first and only project together. No doubt Bobby did like Kazan's letters, and Kazan, too – along with Martin Scorsese, he presented the director with a controversial honorary Oscar in 1999. And one could comfortably claim that those letters had at least one more fan: the archivist. Indeed, if the archivist had a vote, one imagines he'd say, "By all means, keep 'em coming."

Of course, Kazan left this mortal coil some time ago, but De Niro's collection of movie-related materials still swells and has a permanent home at the University of Texas' Harry Ransom Center. Acquired in 2006 and ranging from early head shots to more than 3,000 individual costume items, props, and a full body cast used in the 1994 production of *Frankenstein*, the De Niro holdings feature prominently in a new exhibit called "Making Movies," which explores the collaborative process that goes into the craft and creation of cinema.

"I didn't want to do just another memorabilia show or just, you know, highlights of the collection. I wanted to try to say something," explained Steve Wilson, the HRC's associate curator of film. "I let the materials speak for themselves. So what the collection is about is the various creative jobs that go into making a movie."

The new collection, which opens to the public Feb. 9 and features more than 350 items culled from the HRC's vast holdings, devotes distinct sections to those various creative jobs: director, screenwriter, producer, production designer, art director, actor, costume designer, hair and

makeup artist, cinematographer, special effects designer, editor, and composer. Publicity and exhibition are also highlighted.

Eleven days before opening, I walked through the exhibit with Wilson, sidestepping workmen as they leveled frames on a wall. A hall to be devoted to original costumes like Scarlett O'Hara's burgundy ball gown and Travis Bickle's taxi-driver jacket was still empty - "It's going to be pretty dramatic," Wilson assured me - but the materials already on display were hugely impressive. This is kid-ina-candy-store stuff for any serious movie buff, where every corner turned begs a fresh exclamation: the giant scissors from Spellbound's Dalí dream sequence! Ernest Lehman's brochure from Mount Rushmore, with stage directions for North by Northwest's precipicescaling scribbled in blue ink!

"Making Movies" is heavy on Gone With the Wind artifacts; producer David O. Selznick's papers mark the largest collection at the center, and Selznick, a notorious micromanager and memo-writer, required a lot of paper. In the producer portion of the exhibit, a preproduction chart weighs what rival studios MGM and Warner Bros. could bring to the table (respectively, Clark Gable and Errol Flynn, among other variables). Later, in the section devoted to screenwriting, a list details the pros and cons of writers considered for the Gone With the Wind gig, including Maxwell Anderson, William Faulkner ("not very reliable in his plans or habits"), Philip Barry, and Sinclair Lewis ("might be a little too political minded or a little too ginminded"). The GWTW color scheme devised by William Cameron Menzies - for whom the term production designer was first invented is examined in a wall of painterly storyboards. And around another corner, there's a take-yourbreath-away close-up of Vivien Leigh (see photo, right) with a clapboard labeled "tear stains"; rightly worried about continuity, the filmmakers wanted to make sure they could re-create precisely the mixed streak of dirt and tear.

That image is a particular favorite of Wilson's, who told me he plans to mount the reproduction on his office wall when the exhibit goes down in August. A 20-year veteran of the HRC who previously worked at the Paramount Theatre and the long-shuttered Varsity Theatre on the Drag, Wilson labored a full year on the "Making

Movies" exhibit. He pointed to a nearby display about the 1966 film *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf*?, the assemblage of which, Wilson wagered, took several weeks alone – "and we had three times as much stuff." He looked around ruefully. "I kind of have curator's remorse throughout the show of all the things that didn't make the cut."

What *did* make the cut: a rare early draft of the *Annie Hall* script. Graham Greene's original hand-typed story of *The Third Man*, De Niro's *The Deer Hunter* dialect cheat sheet for "Western

Pennsylvania Language Peculiarities." "He told me a great story," Wilson said when we reached a trove of De Niro materials. "It was sometime around [*The Deer Hunter*]. He was at Western Costume looking for a costume for a movie. And it's real common even today for them to recycle costumes. So he's going through these racks of clothes, and he comes across a costume for *Bonnie and Clyde*. And he said, 'This is wrong that they're recycling this – this is an important [artifact]!' And at that point, he started keeping everything."

The keeping of everything is a curator's dream, of course – especially when the subject



exactingly labels every bric-a-brac, as was the case with screenwriter Ernest Lehman, who started sending his materials to the HRC in the early Sixties. "He wrote notes on everything," said Wilson. "In some cases, it's just kind of better to let him explain things."

But there's thrill in discovery, too, in solving the puzzle of a piece that comes in without any identifiers. Wilson showed me a wall devoted to the archival papers of Alfred Junge, the German-born production designer who worked closely with the Archers, Michael Powell and Emeric Pressburger's film collective. Wilson pointed to a page of doodlings and near-indecipherable note-taking.

"This is all Junge's handwriting. It's written on top of a letter that his son wrote to him. In corresponding with Junge's daughter-in-law, we think that this is some sort of conversation or he was brainstorming with somebody.

"On the other side there's a lot more ballet [drawings]. We think that he was having a talk maybe with [director] Michael Powell, maybe with [costume designer] Hein Heckroth. And we think they were talking about both *The Red Shoes* and *Black Narcissus* at the same time.

"But he makes these notes about Black Narcissus: 'Always just off-white.' The nuns'

habits were off-white and that was kind of the famous thing he did on *Black Narcissus*. It brought the color palette down and it made everything look realistic because of that white not being white but being a little farther down the palette."

For Wilson, the mystery behind that slip of paper wasn't an idle curiosity; rather, it represented something integral about the filmmaking process.

"T'm always trying to show how each one of these artists involved in a film is trying to make a contribution to the characters and the story. A costume designer is not just putting clothes on but is really trying to say something through the clothes."

That fact – that movies are built on attention to the tiniest of details – is the raison d'etre of the exhibit. But if filmmakers are doing their jobs right, then most moviegoers won't even notice. "The vast majority of our collection is about mainstream Hollywood filmmaking, and that style is marked by invisibility, by *not* calling attention to itself and by putting the story and the characters first."

"Making Movies," then, makes that invisible work overt and, in the process, pays remarkable tribute to it.

# **Super Bowl or Super Pulpit?**

When I first heard the grumblings over the Tim Tebow/anti-abortion spots that would run during the Super Bowl this Sunday, my first response was, commercials? Who watches commercials? But of course, this is the Super Bowl. Watching Super Bowl commercials has become a strange rite – an addendum to the main event, like red carpet preshows prior to the awards shows themselves, where a marginally talented interviewer asks inane questions of the assembled celebrities, punctuating the vacant chitchat with the inevitable, "Who are you wearing?"

For those still not in the know about the Tebow hubbub, the story is this: Pam Tebow, mother of University of Florida quarterback Tim Tebow, tells her anti-abortion story in a 30-second spot purchased by Focus on the Family, a conservative Christian organization. Though an illness threatened the life of her unborn son during missionary work in

the Philippines, she rejected recommendations to have an abortion. Forget for a moment that during the time Pam Tebow was pregnant, abortion was not legal under any circumstances, Liliana

Segura points out in her AlterNet.org piece on the subject. Not only was it illegal, anyone administering the procedure or receiving it was looking at serious jail time. But who needs facts when you're trying to make a point?

The 30-second spot hasn't publicly aired yet, but it's already being talked about – not just because of its anti-abortion stance but because of CBS' hypocrisy in running it. In the past, the Super Bowl ads were

limited to such wholesome products as beer, cars, tools, fast food, the Army, and just about anything featuring a scantily clad girl. So-called "issue" ads or advocacy ads are supposedly off limits on CBS and other broadcast networks in general, and especially on Super Bowl Sunday. In the midst of the grumbling, CBS has apparently reconsidered its stance regarding advocacy ads, but that did not stop it from shunning an ad from ManCrunch, an online dating service for gay men. (I saw the ad online. To be fair, the production values are weak, but the commercial itself, about two dudes watching a football game who make a love connection after their hands meet in the chip bowl, made

me laugh out loud.) In the past, CBS nixed a Super Bowl ad from the United Church of Christ that promoted its welcoming of gays and lesbians. Last year, NBC rejected an antiabortion ad that used President Obama in the role of Tim Tebow as the revered "saved" child. PETA and MoveOn.org have also been denied airtime, using the "no advocacy ads" mantra as the reason. So when Focus on the Family broke through the barrier, eyebrows and tempers were raised.

At press time, petitions were circulating online, including one issued by the Feminist Majority Foundation, demanding that CBS not "feed the anger and hatred of anti-abortion extremists." Personally, I wouldn't mind

if CBS ran the ad, as long as it also allowed ads from other advocacy organizations to air, not just the conservative ones. I'm not sure if any of these petitions will have any traction or if CBS will respond, but the one thing the company will pay attention to is the bottom line. What if CBS

held a Super Bowl party and nobody came? What if viewers stopped watching CBS' series? What if viewers actually demanded

that the network respond as a responsible custodian of the airwaves? In a more perfect world, the broadcast airwaves would be used for the public good. Federal Communications Commission regulations aside, that means allowing the public to decide for itself what issues it chooses to support, rather than the network deciding, either by omission or by catering to any particular point of view, left or right. It's not impossible to expect this of our broadcast networks, but it demands caring about issues beyond which is the funniest, slickest, or coolest Super Bowl commercial. As always, stay tuned.

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# **Forsaking the Song**

"What happens onstage is the most important thing that happens here," **Griff Luneburg** told the *Chronicle* last year on the occasion of the **Cactus Cafe**'s 30-year anniversary (see "Blood on the Tracks," Feb. 6, 2009). "The bar is secondary. It's not like that in other clubs. For musicians, it's just a real nurturing environment. One thing I've learned is that it's all about building relationships with people. Loyalty is an important quality in the music business. ... We come from a place where we respect an artist, and they remember that."

If only the **University of Texas** held itself to the same standard.

Citing budgetary concerns, the **Texas Union board** approved plans last Friday to phase out operations at the campus cafe in August, along with UT's longstanding **informal classes**, which serve about 25,000 people per year.

The news spread like an obit over the weekend, the local music community collectively rattled. "It's just terrible," bemoans **Beaver Nelson**, who after his tenure at UT in the early 1990s opened for **Townes Van Zandt** and **Lucinda Williams** at the club. "No one saw this coming."

According to University Unions Executive Director **Andy Smith** on Monday, the cuts will save an estimated \$122,000 a year, about \$50,000 of which would come from the Cactus' closing. "If they had been revenue-positive, we wouldn't have been dealing with them on this, because they would have been contributing to our bottom line and not taking away from it," says Smith, adding that the cafe has been subsidized seven of the last eight years and will be added to the Union's inventory of rooms available for reservation by recognized student organizations and faculty departments. Both Luneburg and longtime bar manager **Chris Lueck** are being promised positions at their current salary levels "in other areas within the division."



When repeatedly pressed on the matter at the town hall meeting on the UT campus on Tuesday, Feb. 2, Smith, with blunt frustration, raised the Cactus' portion to \$66,000.

"If it's a matter of money, we will raise the money to keep the Cactus open,"

offered **Reid Nelson** on behalf of the 17,000-plus represented by the "**Save the** 

**Cactus Cafe (Austin, Texas)**" Facebook group. Other speakers offered alternatives such as creating patronage programs for the Cactus comparable to that of **Texas Performing Arts (**formerly the **Performing Arts Center**) and the **Blanton Museum of Art**, both UT offshoots. **Jim Boon** of the **Texas Exes** has expressed interest in making the Cactus part of the expansion plans for the **Etter-Harbin Alumni Center**, a symbolic gesture that ignores the historical significance of the venue itself.

Despite strong, passionate opposition from the standing-room-only audience that overflowed into two neighboring classrooms, UT President **Bill Powers** defended the decision made by the Texas Union board, which comprises six student members and three faculty members appointed by the UT president (see "'A' Is for Axed," News, p.18).


Smith, who was the main force behind the 1997 termination of the **Texas Union Film Program** (see "The

> Last Picture Show," News, Jan. 23, 1998), also stated in the press release that the cafe and informal classes "do not fit within the core student mission of the Texas Union and Student Affairs." **Dan Grissom**, the host of open mic night at the Cactus, estimates that half of the weekly performers are students, while numerous students expressed frustration and confusion with the board's decision at the forum.

> "Griff has always handpicked the stuff that would speak to the students' sensibilities of growth, excellence, and a even little bit of revolution," relates **David Garza**, whose collegiate outfit **Twang Twang Shock-a-Boom** went from busking on the West Mall to headlining the Cactus his freshman year and, two decades later, reunited last December at the venue. "I know firsthand that he definitely opens his eyes and his ears to new artists. I can't think of another venue in the country that draws from the students and the students' spirit."



After overturning a question in the sixth and final round about the title of **Watchtower**'s first album, *Energetic Disassembly* (more on that next week), the *Chronicle*'s **Twenty Tinnitus** – myself, team captain **Audra Schroeder**, Senior Account Executive **Jerald Corder**, Music critic **Greg Beets**, and my *Chronthology* co-editor **Doug Freeman** – took home the gold at the first **Mind Over Music** trivia bowl at the **Palm Door** on Monday, edging out stiff competition from **Austin City Limits**, **KUT**, and 25 other local music industry teams of five people each. Judy Collins, John Doe, Talking Heads/ Tom Tom Club's Chris Frantz and Tina Weymouth, and Andrew W.K. are among the artists now on board for panel discussions at South by Southwest 2010. "We really want the musicians to get into the discussion," relays coordinator Andy Flynn. The list of showcasing artists continues to blossom. Notable additions include Chamillionaire & Paul Wall, Hauschka, Mayer Hawthorne, and Sharon Jones & the Dap-Kings, while keynote speaker Smokey Robinson is set to anchor the Austin Music Hall on Friday, March 19. www.sxsw.com/music.

The Austin delegation at the 52nd annual Grammy Awards – Willie & the Wheel, Shawn Colvin, Ruthie Foster, Conspirare, and Sarah Jarosz – were sent home emptyhanded on Sunday, though Steve Earle's emotionally hewn tribute Townes earned Best Contemporary Folk Album. Oscar nominations on Tuesday included a Best Original Song nod to Ryan Bingham and T Bone Burnett for "The Weary Kind (Theme From Crazy Heart)." The Young, which helps commemorate the release of Matador's Casual Victim Pile compilation at Beerland on Friday, Feb. 5, is releasing an LP this summer on Mexican Summer, the vinyl-only subsidiary of Kemado Records. As guitarist/vocalist Hans Zimmerman confides, "It's a record for dopers and creeps."

As a quick tour of Emo's outside patio attests, the history of rock & roll scenes is sometimes best told through the concert posters plastered in its wake. From the surrealist psychedelia of San Francisco's Big Five through the silk-screened absurdity of Austin's Lindsey Kuhn, that inextricable link and history goes under the lens in the new documentary American Artifact, which screens at the Alamo Drafthouse Lake Creek on Friday (Feb. 5), complete with a Q&A with director Merle Becker, a poster show in the lobby, and a demo session by Billy Bishop. Local legend Frank Kozik, in particular, is credited in the film for the poster art resurgence of the early 1990s. "It was not just a new poster art form," posits Jello Biafra. "It was almost a new kind of humor bursting out from behind the closet."

# Buddy Holly's biggest bang

"Good evening, Austin," says Keith Richards like the King of England himself, stepping back from the microphone to let the words hang in the crisp air of Zilker Park. Still a thrill sliding out disc one from the Rolling Stones' *The Biggest Bang* 4-DVD set, on which is printed below the concert venue/program: "Austin, Texas USA."

"How y'all doing? All right?" continues the guitarist. "You got a great spot here, you know. I'm thinking of moving in. Anyone got a room? I say that to all the girls."

Father riff says that to all the "Little T&A," the song after the one he's introducing.

"Anyway, I thought, just for a change, we want to pay homage to a great Texan – a man named Buddy Holly."

Forty thousand live music capitalists cheer Richards' stone-faced reverence.

"So we're gonna have a bash at 'Learning the Game."

Nothing. Zero crowd reaction. If birds sang at night, you'd have heard their twitter.

Had Mick Jagger been onstage singing, the first song on the UK eternals' first album, biggest bangs covering the Panhandle's No. 1 son via The Rolling Stones (England's Newest

Buddy Holly's "Not Fade Away," might have gotten the nod instead, opening hex on the band's *Voodoo Lounge* tour in the mid 1990s. Richards' customary two-tune interludes in Stones shows over the last three decades have dealt a card or two from the bottom of the deck, but surely "Peggy Sue" or "Rave On" would have struck a more capital chord.

A puff of talcum powder on the neck of his Fender precedes Richards' Lone Star-sized take on the song. Age and eyeliner can't hide the teen in his eyes as he barks.

Hearts that are broken And love that's untrue That's what's called learning the game When you love her but she doesn't love you That's when you're learning the game

In green Tolkien jacket and *Cat in the Hat* scarf – earring and headband as though a Moroccan prince – Richards delivers Holly's punch line with teeth clenched and his Anubis yawp in a lower register, a man who *knows* the game. Ronnie Wood rings his weathered Stratocaster.

"One for Buddy, pals," concludes the bandleader three minutes later.

# 'Rock-a-Bye Rock'

Equally precious, also never-to-be-performedagain jewel from that supernatural night in Zilker Park 2006, Waylon Jennings' "Bob Wills Is Still the King" has its roots in Holly too, if only by extension. Jennings famously gave up his seat on the plane that killed Holly on Feb. 3, 1959, as well as Ritchie Valens. Five weeks earlier, he'd added hand claps to "You're the One," written and sung by Holly on the spot – on a dare – live for KLLL radio in Lubbock, bleating here on disc four of *Not Fade Away*. Outlaw country's future monarch wrote and baritoned "Bob Wills Is Still the King," but had he lived past 22, Charles Hardin "Buddy" Holley might have written it first.


Country boy beginning with Not Fade Away's first primitive notes, a cover of Hank Snow's "My Two-Timin' Woman," rock & roll's beloved hiccup has been boiled down over the decades to a half-dozen classic rock radio basics. Beyond the British Invasion's two biggest bangs covering the Panhandle's No. 1 son via The Rolling Stones (England's Newest

Hit Makers) and Beatles for Sale, both 1964, Holly – his surname surrendering a vowel to fame – midwifed rock & roll more through style and story told and retold than by sheer catalog alone. Zilker Park scratching its collective head at Richards' pronouncement of "Learning the Game" is no more surprising than the guttural roar rising from the same giddy throng upon

Jagger name-dropping both Bob Wills and Waylon Jennings within spitting distance of the Broken Spoke. Buddy Holly, Not Fade Away: The Complete Studio Recordings and More, the first such domestic gathering, corrects one of these phenomena.

Bound yearbook style, priceless pictures including the day of Holly's biggest bang – opening for Elvis Presley in Lubbock's Fair Park Coliseum, 1955 – *Not Fade Away* twangs, rocks, and breaks your heart like an audio biography, every track a page of Buddy Holly's brief musical lifetime – a recorded burst starting that year of Presley and cut short by the winter tour that resulted in his death four years later. Texans should consider its 79 pages required reading, the narrative a breathless one.

Grouped chronologically by session, the set's first session is one song, the aforementioned "My Two-Timin' Woman," its credit – "Recorded Holley family home, Lubbock,



Texas, circa 1949" – doing almost all the talking except for the track itself, which initially sounds like an ancient radio frequency tuning in a lost race record – a young black girl maybe. Halfway through its 2:16 runtime, someone tweaks the recording equipment, and steel, wood, and electricity come together, but the singer still sounds like a young woman. Meet "Buddy," 13.

The Holley family homestead, on Sixth Street in Lubbock, next hosts its youngest of three brothers with his first musical sounding board, Bob Montgomery, as Buddy & Bob for a trio of tracks, the resident dweller on mandolin and a high, sweet voice. Sound improves from the first cut's can-against-a-wall sonics, but here the primitive recording evokes discovery rather than novelty. The third of three, "Footprints in the Snow," pierces the fog of the past best. Good ol' West Texan Sonny Curtis (see

Good ol' West Texan Sonny Curtis (see "Love Is All Around," Oct. 15, 2004) joins Buddy & Bob on fiddle for five tunes recorded in Wichita Falls 1954-55 that include bass and, on one track, steel guitar. These are cowboy songs in the grand tradition of Gene Autry and Sons of the Pioneers, all written

by Montgomery, the last a collaboration with Holly. "I Gambled My Heart" is ground zero for Not Fade Away in terms of the Buddy Holly warble (soon to be hiccup). Future Crickets drummer and mainstay to this day Jerry Allison appears next - just in time for first memorable "Down the Line," its solo evoking Bill Haley's "Rock Around the Clock" and its rhythm courtesy of Johnny Cash, Carl Perkins, and the Southern Pacific Railroad. Holly's lead vocals and hiccup on "Baby, Let's Play House" births Elvis' little brother with the thick black glasses. Sonny Curtis then returns for five mostly originals back in Lubbock, three previously unreleased and all of the them the West Texas equivalents of London skiffle, proto rock & roll birthing the British Invasion.

Montgomery's finally gone directly after that for a quartet of tunes by a quartet: Holly, Curtis, Allison, and bassist Don Guess. Here again, the group leader finally reverberates, like a string tied to a broom handle nailed to an upside-down wash basin, particularly on the bassist's jitterbugging "Moonlight Baby" (aka "Baby, Won't You Come Out Tonight"). If that doesn't whet your appetite, some of this material boomerangs back in gloriously clear mono from Nashville, courtesy of one of country music's sound architects: Owen Bradley. Minus Allison, with Holly's second guitar handled by session legend Grady Martin, the Texans twang out five tracks as if cracklin' grits. Tracks 29-35, finishing the first disc, finally originate from Clovis, New Mexico, 1956, at the control boards of the Crickets future George Martin/Brian Wilson/ Phil Spector – Norman Petty.

Holly, Curtis, and Allison ring out six Holly solo compositions, rockabilly lean and clean as laboratory moonshine, "I'm Gonna Set My Foot Down" an anatomically blunter precursor to the Stones' "Under My Thumb." The opening seconds of "Rock-a-Bye Rock" hold the DNA of "That'll Be the Day."

# '(You're So Square) Baby I Don't Care'

One step forward, two steps back: Disc two opens with a return to Nashville for two sessions four months apart in the second half of 1956. Back and forth, Texas to Tennessee and back, that's the early trek. Holly/Curtis/ Allison/Guess practically invent the reedy vibration of all future garage rock again under the Moses watch of Bradley, rockabilly for the diet-pill set. An early version of Holly-Allison rally cry "That'll Be the Day" enters the dance contest but only comes in third. Curtis is gone for a Music Row return, though his clacking "Rock Around With Ollie Vee" remains, while Guess' "Modern Don Juan" receives the crooning of its life from Holly.

In the Holley family garage that same November and into December, Holly and Allison go Black Keys as a lo-fi duo, 12 covers known as "The Garage Tapes" kicking off with "Gone" and "Have You Ever Been Lonely" knocking three times each. "Gone" ballads almost to a dirge, but "Lonely" bops.

Chuck Berry's "Brown-Eyed Handsome Man" strikes out, but "Good Rockin' Tonight" brings the boogie, and "Rip It Up" does some balling tonight on Holly's screech ("*yeeeooow*"). The singer's boyish delivery of

Fats Domino's "Blue Monday" blueprints Keith Richards' vocal approach to the same song on the Stone's solo bootlegs. Laying the groundwork for the disc's penultimate song, "Bo Diddley" bomps out its Caribbean limbo, and Holly croaking out Clarence "Frogman" Henry's "Ain't Got No Home" might just be the B-side of Not Fade Away.

Once the guitarist and drummer are back in Clovis with Norman Petty and finally Crickets Niki Sullivan (rhythm guitar) and Joe B. Mauldin (bass), the lone stars are coming in loud and proud. Holly & Petty's "I'm Looking for Someone to Love" could be Little Steven's garage-door opener, only now "That'll Be the Day" adds Petty's writing credit to the fold and with good reason: Here comes the flood. The already irresistible first version of "Maybe Baby" cuts a path next, followed by future Beatles caress "Words of Love." Holly's crying hiccup on "Mailman Bring Me No More Blues" stops you in your tracks, but then so will the only two appearances of "Not Fade Away," an instant sing-along from that May 29, 1957, session. "Everyday" closes the disc with equally unbelievable aural memorabilia, its lullaby shhhh vocal and Allison's pajama

percussion doing for pop music what rocking chairs did for mothers with newborns.

With the group solidified, the third disc is the charm, tearing it up from the get-go of opener "Ready Teddy," in which the Fab Four's future Hamburg residency as leather boys gets a good scuffing. Vi Petty's organ on the succeeding Fats Domino cover "Valley of Tears" again cements the Crescent City's piano king as runner-up to Elvis Presley in rock & roll's big bang, Holly then asserting his bronze metal status in that category with two takes of "Peggy Sue" on the surf percussion of Jerry Allison. Holly's clean-cut suitor vocals still manage a hormonal urgency on the tongue of its messenger. And 1957 was far from over, as undubbed hopper "Oh Boy" bucks rodeo exuberance prior to the heavy petting of "I'm Gonna Love You Too." Oh man.

Conch-shell sound washes out two previously unreleased and

undubbed performances, including "It's Too Late," and even with Sumerian sound Holly's sincerity oozes into the mix as though by the magnification of his drugstore eyewear. Chase that with the master take of "Oh Boy" and its white gospel seal of harmonic approval by the Picks – John Pickering, Bill Pickering, and Texas Tech baritone

"I'm ready to crap out on this day for sure," laughs Holly with laconic cheer.

Bob Lapham – on their way to the Rockabilly Hall of Fame. The Picks back two recording sessions that September/October, and though there's no blunting the peak purity of Holly's

vocal pledge, their picket fence harmony wash works ("Maybe Baby") less and less (Roy Orbison & Norman Petty's "An Empty Cup [and a Broken Date]"), simply too churchy for rock & roll. Their prairie campfire blowing "*last night, last night, last night I prayed for you*" on Holly's "Last Night" applies holy water to forehead as it exits the house of worship. Paradoxically, given Holly's holy legacy, the second session with the Picks counts among the most sanctified moments of disc three ("Tell Me How").

Down to a core of Holly, Allison, and Mauldin by the end of 1957, the trio's tighter

than a rubber band and never more so than on Leiber/Stoller's "(You're So Square) Baby I Don't Care," the singer's vocals coming in Elvis deep and the song's refrain too delicious for words. Holly and Allison alone on four little-heard workups of Bo Diddley's "Mona," including their studio conferencing, are icing on that scone. A whole passel of New Yorkers show up for an East Coast session Jan. 25, 1958, bulking up the steely "Rave On," but it's soon back to Clovis where Holly, Allison, and Mauldin cut rock counterculture anthem to be, "Well ... All Right."

# 'Crying, Waiting, Hoping'

Holly's voice dips profundo in the chorus refrain to "Think It Over" ("a lonely heart grows cold and old"), which thrice opens the fourth disc. Allison's famed cardboard box as drum makes one of its intermittent appearances on "Take Your Time," a false start that's breathtaking revealing either Holly's exhaustion or his having misplaced his glasses.

"The page just blurs," he says. "I can't even see the words looking right at them."

Someone exclaims, "Nap time!"

"I'm ready to crap out on this day for sure," laughs Holly with laconic cheer.

"Fool's Paradise" and "Lonesome Tears" are streaked with Holly's trademark sad-sackery, which as usual bobs and weaves with the singer's elastic tenor in a way that guarantees the song's narrator is singing his laments even as he's climbing back into love's saddle. "It's So Easy," a huge hit for Linda Ronstadt in the 1970s, pierces your ear with a hook larger than a Gypsy hoop. "Love's Made a Fool of You" bumps Bo Diddley's beat on its way to the same rodeo.

New York sessions and covers of Bobby Darin and Paul Anka can't compare to Holly's supple vocals on King Curtis' "Reminiscing," on which the too-soon-taken Texas tenor sax man adds smoky licks. It's late in the day for Holly, the second session taking place in October when he'll be gone the following February. "True Love Ways" is the mist covering the steel rails of Anka's "It Doesn't Matter Anymore," the plinking strings taking Holly from rock to dentist's office, but such stereophonic crooning imagines the singer's twilight years singing for Verve, which put out Anka's *Rock Swings* in 2005.

Disc four closes with seven solo acoustic originals from Holly and his new bride Maria

Elena's Fifth Avenue love nest in Manhattan, including crystalcut and titanium set strummer "Peggy Sue Got Married." Vocal hitch "Crying, Waiting, Hoping" sets up the unassuming "Learning the Game." By the fifth CD, which finishes the rest of "The Apartment Tapes," time's run out. Dated "between January 1 and 20, 1959," the latter date being the day Holly left home for good, two slow versions of Little Richard's "Slippin' and Slidin'" - the first on which you can hear Maria Elena doing the dishes, the second contorting with Holly's vocal yoga - precede a streamlined, up-tempo electric take of the rocker, which assumes almost epic proportion in that it sets up another highlight: three minutes of ambient eavesdropping on Buddy and Maria Elena, the young couple talking into the recorder at the end. Maria Elena's Mexican accent crackles with joy.

"What time do you have, baby?" she asks as the tape fades out. "Twenty-five to 3," replies Holly.

Ironically, the Ray Charles Singers' white marble overdubs on four tunes warped in a NYC recording studio a year after Holly's death tallies only a microfraction of posthumous havoc wreaked. Once Norman Petty takes over in Clovis two years later, installing guitarist George Tomsco's Fireballs quartet, overdubs on Holly material mesh better, thicker rockabilly than the lithe box-top skiffle of the Crickets. Covers of Chuck Berry's "Brown-Eyed Handsome Man" and "Bo Diddley" from one Clovis session benefit especially from the Fireballs' beefier sound.

Another session of "The Apartment Tapes" overdubs star Tomsco's surf tones on "Peggy Sue Got Married," which matches a jubilant, street parade musical reading of "Crying, Waiting, Hoping," while Holly's "That's What They Say" takes on an almost Burt Bacharach swinging 1960s quality, and a cotillion take of "Learning the Game" reimagines the song yet again. Circling back to the start with the Fireballs overdubbing the earliest material from the set's first two CDs, *Not Fade Away*'s sixth and final disc overdubs Charles Hardin Holley into reissue perpetuity.

"What time do you have, baby?" Forever.



# MERMEN In God We Trust (KMA)

"Starfish and giant foams greet us with a smile," sang Jimi Hendrix on "1983 ... (A Merman I Should Turn to Be)," *Electric Ladyland*'s watery ode. "Before our heads go under, we take a last look at the killing noise." Mermen trident Jim

Thomas remains that killing noise. Leading the instrumental S.F. trio's original lineup - Thomas (guitar), Allen Whitman (bass), Martyn Jones (drums) - on its first studio LP in a decade, the real-life Merman channels not instrumental surf music as much as water therapy. Short of Dick Dale and the Ventures' Nokie Edwards, no guitarist has captured oceanic thunder better than Thomas, the only one of the three whose sonic brand belongs to the Radiohead era. Third, final, and best Atlantic Records offshoot, 2000's The Amazing California Health and Happiness Road Show mated the retro shimmer of indie debut Krill Slippin' (1989) to the titanic thrust of sophomore masterpiece Food for Other Fish (1994), both selfreleased works subsumed by the major label miasma of A Glorious Lethal Euphoria ('95) and its offshoot EP Songs of the Cows ('96). Unexpected return In God We Trust picks up where Health and Happiness left off, miles below any rocky surf, moving deeper and deeper into the depths of amniotic rock music. With five cuts between eight and 13 minutes and the remaining four tracks all over the five-minute mark, God digs in beginning with the soft opening of speciously titled first-responder "One Hundred

JUST KIDS by Patti Smith

HarperCollins, 304 pp., \$27

Patti Smith's debut album, 1975's *Horses*, surely would have achieved its iconic status without the tuff cover photo, but you can bet it would have taken a lot longer. Legion are those who picked it up because they were drawn to Robert Mapplethorpe's cover photograph – a study in androgyny, vulnerability, homage, and swagger – only to have their heads turned around when they put needle to record. It's a testament to artistic collaboration, a usually fraught and loaded act Smith and Mapplethorpe perfected during their long, complicated relationship – starting as lovers in the late 1960s, becoming friends as Mapplethorpe's homosexuality emerged, then taking care of each other materially and artistically until his premature death in 1989.

"Robert was concerned with how to make the photograph, and I with how to be the photograph," writes Smith in *Just Kids*, her memoir of her time with Mapplethorpe, but that's a hedge; we're meant to see both artists' mutability, the equivalent artistry and easy passage between observing and constructing oneself to be observed. *Just Kids* requires buying into a few concepts that can now seem quaint, if not contrived: the transcendence of art and the sanctity of the artist, the idea that creation is hard work, the notion that ambition and bohemianism are not at mutual odds, and, probably, the existence of God. Once you're on board, though, it's a beautiful ride. We follow Smith from South Jersey to Brooklyn, then the Chelsea Hotel and the Lower East Side, as she seeks, kills, and resurrects her idols, working in bookstores and shacking up with Sam Shepard and Allen Lanier, hanging out and dropping names (Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin, Andy Warhol's retinue, and many more notables). There are mythologized and uncanny incidents, to be sure, but the incantatory strength of voice and detail wins us over. This is the storytelling Smith we hear less often in her songs and poetry than in improvised banter during her live performances, readings, and interviews: direct, linear, humble, hilarious.

The cumulative effect has the same epic thunder as her "Land" trilogy or her "Gloria: In Excelsis Deo/Gloria" mashup, both of which we learn were in part inspired by seeing Mapplethorpe in his element: leaning on a parking meter outside the Whitney Museum (they couldn't afford two tickets), screaming around the Village after midnight. When she paints a picture of the bohemian wonderland that was 1970s lower Manhattan, we're wistful. When we learn that at one point Smith cried so often that Mapplethorpe christened her "Soakie," we're amused. When she describes Mapplethorpe's literalized torment as he transforms from good Catholic boy to confrontational, fetish-seeking artist, we're both thrilled and saddened. And when she promises him, posthumously, that "art sings of God," we find it easy to believe her.

Foot Lemon," scene-setting mood enhancer/meander and longest board. Ten-minute follow-up "Trapeze" tiptoes the high wire of all-time Mermen classics with dreamy bell tones, its ping a gravityfree descent to luminous depths. "More Wood Less Head" continues the slice

through peak brine like a nuclear submarine, its needlepoint hook and end siren a perfect whirlpool of completeness. "There Is a Door, It Opens, Then It Is Closed," all 11 minutes next, doesn't quite hang correctly on its three hinges, after which In God We Trust starts to drift. "Jesus in the Sky" makes for a pretty sunset, but an acrylic one in a beach motel. Meanwhile, midtempo paddle "Apo Calypso" splashes equal to its lemony title, though like so many Mermen strokes, its final funnel births its best moments. "Righteous Punishment" lacks just that, and "Costo Knowone" never reveals an identity, but skating closer "Last Forever (the Current Sea)" marries the idyllic purity of Krill Slippin' to the instrumental metaphysics of The Amazing California Health and Happiness Road Show. Mitigating the success or failure of any one track is each individual note of In God We Trust. As with all Mermen discs, all droplets return to the same sea, the bigger body of water as it were, where each eddy and tidal pool ultimately moves within a larger mass. Man swims, but rarely do his senses isolate the droplets of water on his face as being apart from that in which his body is immersed. - Raoul Hernandez \*\*\*

BEACH HOUSE Teen Dream (Sub Pop) Beach House's previous two albums – 2006's

and Devotion two



years later - worked well as set-pieces, jumping between stoned love songs and mystic invocations, accented with warm wind chimes and other shore sounds. Those albums were the aural equivalent of Xanax, and it worked for the Baltimore duo, but on its Sub Pop debut, the dynamic shifts subtly. It still sounds like a Beach House album - Victoria Legrand's drowsy, rolling keys; Alex Scally's chiming guitar – but the druggy effect has worn off. "Zebra" and "10 Mile Stereo" are upbeat, Legrand measuring out some of the Stevie Nicks thunder waiting to come booming out of her. Restraint allows them to make better use of their set-pieces, however, birthing some of the album's more fully realized songs. Drums sound like drums, not programmed beats on "Used to Be" and "Silver Soul," and Legrand elbows out some heavy piano pining on "Real Love," She expands her vocal range as well, going from husky to bell-clear in one swoop, but spends too much time filling empty space with hey-ey-eys and oh-oh-ohs instead of actual lyrics, like on "Norway." The album centerpiece is "Lover of Mine," which wants to be Teen Dream's "Rhiannon," but it only gets halfway up the mountain. A solid third LP, but it's not Beach House's "masterpiece." They've still got some gold dust to kick up.

### VAMPIRE WEEKEND Contra (XL) Vampire Weekend's eponymous 2008 debut

Vampire Weekend's eponymous 2008 debut proved a rare pop triumph, succeeding in its creation of an



entire aesthetic - Ivy League Afro-pop. The New York quartet works its way out of that corner on its meticulous sculpted sophomore LP, Contra, branching out with tangents into kinetic ska-punk ("Holiday," "Cousins") and hyper dancehall music (the magnificent "Giving Up the Gun" and Auto-Tuned "California English"). Produced once more by keyboardist Rostam Batmanglij, the album succeeds largely through the melding of his electronic-pop side project Discovery with his more classically minded string arrangements, as evinced by the delicate "Taxi Cab" and festive, horn-accented "Run." While there are still remnants of Paul Simon's Graceland, found mainly in singer/guitarist Ezra Koenig's effortlessness with melody and vocal phrasing (the lilting "White Sky"), there's much more at work here. "Diplomat's Son" appropriates M.I.A., and the colorful calypso "Horchata" marries throbbing beats with oil-rig percussion, kalimba, and eloquently sweeping string arrangements, recalling Koenig's cameo on the Very Best's Warm Heart of Africa. Closer "I Think UR a Contra," a confessional ballad cast over a haunting backdrop of lucid guitars and other ethereal ornamentation, displays a moment of rare vulnerability, ultimately proving that Vampire Weekend is capable of cutting through pretense and trivial pursuits. - Austin Powell \*\*\*\*

# **LEAD STORY**

What Recession? A December USA Today analysis revealed that during the first 18 months of the recent recession, beginning December 2007, the number of federal employees with six-figure salaries shot up from 14% of the federal workforce to 19%. Defense Department civilian executives earning more than \$150,000 went from 1,868 to more than 10,000, and the Department of Transportation, which had only one person earning \$170,000 in December 2007, now has 1,690. The average federal salary is \$71,206, compared with the private sector's \$40,331.

# **COMPELLING EXPLANATIONS**

# WHY AFRICANS REMAIN IMPOVERISHED

The huge, \$27 million statue (*African Renaissance*) being built in Dakar, Senegal, was conceived to boost tourism and be a point of African pride, acting as a magnet for visitors and museumgoers. Problems have arisen (the statue was built by North Korean labor, has no distinct African theme, and features a female who reveals perhaps too much thigh). However, according to a November BBC News dispatch, Senegal's President Abdoulaye Wade remains optimistic and has declared that, though the concept was his idea, he personally will magnanimously take only 35% of the revenue generated from visitors.

By 2004 presidential proclamation and 2007 statute, the U.S. government made it clear that no foreign official or family members would be allowed into the country if they are "involved in corruption" regarding oil or other natural resources in their home countries. However, as The New York Times reported in November, Equatorial Guinea's oil minister (and son of its president) owns a \$35 million estate in Malibu, Calif., that he visits regularly in his Gulfstream jet even though the U.S. Justice Department regards him as a major agent of corruption. U.S. companies manage Equatorial Guinea's oil production, and the State Department is reluctant to challenge the country, according to officials cited by the Times.


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

The **Blacksmith Shop** in Bellville showcases 4,000 years of metalworking technology, from hand-operated bellows to electrical arc welding. This is a working blacksmith shop, but the smith

is always ready to show visitors around. "If I talk too much during the day," says

Cowboy Szymanski, "then I just have to work late. It happens, and I don't mind a bit."

About a half-dozen years ago, Szymanski visited the county seat of Austin County to give a blacksmithing demonstration at the local heritage festival. Several of the local business leaders of the town were impressed enough to offer Szymanski a deal on the vacant blacksmith shop built in 1891.



Encased under decades of dust and grime in the old building were the essentials of a blacksmithing shop. The brick hearth was still functional, and several worn anvils that were too heavy to carry off were lying around on the battered wooden floor. The pulleys that once connected a steam engine to the metalworking stamps and presses still hung from the ceiling. Szymanski had to make his own bellows to feed oxygen to the fire.

This may be a museum, but it's a workshop first. Amongst the piles of metal and heavy equipment, Szymanski loves to talk about his craft and art. He credits the beginning of his metalworking career to when he was a boy and created his own knight costumes. While making a living as a professional extreme-sport athlete, he began looking for the old blacksmiths to show him the tricks of the trade. For almost 30 years he has chosen the hammer, forge, and anvil as his stock and trade. He worked the festival circuit until the Bellville offer came along.

Szymanski is an artist, not just in metalworking, but also in wood, stained glass, and anything else he applies his talents to. The wooden handles he makes for his knives are as intricate as the blades. He also has made furniture and kitchen utensils and altered surgical tools for a local veterinarian.

If Szymanski has a specialty, it is his Damascus knives. Damascus steel is made by an ancient method of folding hot steel over onto itself to form a hard metal with lines much like wood grain. Picture the strands of a steel cable heated red hot and hammered into a solid piece of steel. "The knife blade has to have strength and flexibility," he says. "It's as much about the aesthetics as it is the functionality."

The Blacksmith Shop, featuring Phenix handmade knives, is at 305 E. Main, two blocks from the county courthouse. Szymanski's living history museum is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10am to 5pm. He often has the forge fired up in the afternoons and nearly always on Saturdays. For more information, call 713/724-6813 or go to www.phenixknives.com





Talk about living under a lucky star. Just when the peddler Lazuli has unwittingly insulted the King of the 36 Realms (see, his majesty was wearing a false nose and glasses at the time)

and the poor lad appears doomed to execution by La-Z-Boy (see, this large, nasty spike springs up when you recline), the royal astrologer barges in to say that Lazuli's fate is entwined with the king's, and if the peddler perishes, the king kicks the monarchical bucket, too. In a flash, Lazuli is being fêted by the king and is heaved into a humongous, yellow inflatable armchair that looks like it came from the den of the Jolly Jaune Giant.

We must be living under our own lucky star to be blessed with a production like this one of L'Étoile from Austin Lyric Opera. It's just like that outsized armchair: larger than life, colorful, not a little ludicrous, and bouncy bouncy bouncy, which, in these days of uncertainty and stress, makes it a lifesaver.

The foundation for the show's buoyancy comes from composer Emmanuel Chabrier and librettists Eugène Leterrier and Albert Vanloo, whose 1877 opera suggests how Gilbert and Sullivan might have sounded had they been born on the opposite side of the English Channel. The music capers with the same infectiously merry air as Sir Arthur's albeit with a continental effervescence - and, as with Sullivan, just when you think Chabrier's nothing but bubbles and fluff, he brings forth a melody so lusciously lush as to make you swoon. (And conductor Richard Buckley works his musicians to make it ravishing.) The story is on par with those G&S gambols full of firstglance romances, constraining customs, convoluted legal hindrances, and the odd family curse. On top of the above nonsense, Lazuli is mad for a princess from a neighboring country who is supposed to marry King Ouf, but neither peddler nor ruler knows that's who she is because she's been masquerading as the wife of the diplomat who squired her there, and ... well, you get the idea. It's a house of cards built from a deck that's all jokers.

ALO's staging builds on that with animated stylishness. Literally. Andrew Lieberman's

set and Constance Hoffman's costumes (created for Glimmerglass Opera in 2001) feel made by a Warner Bros. animator on a Dom Pérignon bender: an op art wall studded with googly eyes, can-can girls in candy colors, men in black suits holding open umbrellas as they glide across stage on scooters, the astrologer in a lime-sherbet driving coat and cherry-red fez, the king swallowed in a fur coat so voluminous that his head looks like an egg popping out of a raccoon's mouth. The tall, curvy, mirrored walls flanking the action tell the tale: This is a fun house. And stage director Alain Gauthier and choreographer Jeff Michael Rebudal play up that notion with cartoon schtick, mock ballet moves, melodramatic gestures, and dance steps from the Ministry of Silly Walks, which the performers execute with admirable foolery. Mezzo Deborah Domanski evokes Lazuli's raffishness and bovishness with enthusiasm, while soprano Nili Riemer, as his sweetheart, Laoula, could show Dudley Do-Right's Nell a thing or two about playing the pure-hearted ingenue. Austin mezzo Liz Cass relishes the sauciness of the diplomat's wife, Aloès, and bass Kevin Glavin makes every appearance of the astrologer Siroco an occasion for big fun - especially when he's playing off Jean-Paul Fouchécourt's Ouf. The French tenor inhabits the little king with such crisp comic formality, it's clear why he's been tapped to play the part everywhere from Cincinnati to Geneva. And the ALO chorus - singing, dancing, scootering, and doing more than they seem to have ever done before - is a joy to watch, because they're also having more fun than ever before.

And why wouldn't they be? This is a merry Star, made to sparkle and give delight. And so it does, in abundance. For which we may, as they say, "thank our lucky stars." Merci beaucoup, L'Étoile! - Robert Faires

If you've ever pondered the meaning of life while vacuuming – and who hasn't – you can relate to Headlong Dance Theater's *more.*, a study in domestic life overhung by the subconscious' questioning of it all.

Co-directors David Brick, Amy Smith, and Andrew Simonet created the hourlong piece, in collaboration with the six dancers, under the mentorship of pretty famous New York-based choreographer Tere O'Connor. According to the program notes, the Headlong directors, after working together for 15 years, engaged in a two-year conversation with O'Connor to invigorate their material and methods. Having never seen the Philadelphia-based company pre-O'Connor, I can't attest to any transformation, but I can tell you that more. was a weighty piece, both cerebral and immediate. While my reaction to the piece as it was being performed was to distance myself from its retrocool facade and stark movement, I found that with time, more, staved with me, the images loosening into a contemporary archetype that I recognized not so much with the mind but with the consciousness.

The work began in silence as a female dancer, androgynous in a gray suit, introduced the type of percussive movement that continued throughout the show. The movement was repetitive and characterized by the momentum that drove it. For example, the flapping of a single hand gained momentum until the hand reached the other arm, pushing it outward, and the arm pulled the body to the floor. It seemed organic in a real carbon sense: The movement seemed purely of the body, not of emotion. In contrast, there were times when a dancer broke into a completely free, twirling type of dance with arms upstretched, as if representing near-freedom from the body.

While the stage was bare at the beginning of the work, the dancers soon began to haul in furniture to create the living room that was the set for much of the piece. In an exploration of domesticity and ritual, the dancers arranged and rearranged themselves on the turquoise vinyl couch (set and costume design by Maiko Matsushima). One dancer removed a medical boot from her foot and performed strengthening exercises with a Thera-Band; another vacuumed the rug. An iPod appeared, and a recorded voice attempted to explain their state of existence: "You seem to have a lot of questions about what goes away and what stays. Body parts go away, but the heartbeat stays." They took turns changing the soundtrack, and various relationships evolved and disappeared. Even within the seemingly cozy limits of the living room, nothing was stable.

Often, ritual was familiar yet bizarre. One dancer performed acupuncture on another, and large tree branches were placed around the furniture, transforming the space. A microwave appeared, and everyone stood and waited as one dancer heated, and ate, a frozen quiche. Up until this point, the piece was contained in the living room, giving it the confinement of a television sitcom. But here the dancers carefully disassembled the living room, bringing each piece of furniture to a pile downstage right, and the quiche-eating dancer added herself and the remainder of her meal to the pile.

After the careful upending of couch and tables, the gray-suited dancer, having shed a couple of layers of restricting costume, began peeling off strips of the marley floor, revealing a bright-green subfloor and a completely new environment. Those remaining brought in lengths of wood and constructed a fence around the green area, containing her. Looking over the fence as if observing a baby farm animal, they chanted, "Hip, hip, hooray!" before exiting the stage. The enclosure was clearly a lightening transformation for the now-alone character, as her movements, still stark but no longer tight, showed rejoice in release from the limitations of objects and customs. - Jonelle Seitz

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# Harmonia Ariosa st. Mary Cathedral



The line for tickets led out the door and snaked around the corner on this frigid Friday night. I took my place at the end of the line, huddled close amongst the others, the crowd buzzing

in anticipation as it made its way to the warmth that lay within. It was exciting to know that this same scene was taking place concurrently at myriad venues across Downtown, in worship of the live music continuum offered up on any given night in our capital.

This night, St. Mary Cathedral played host to the Texas Early Music Project's winter concert, which included an impressive list of guest artists from around the world. More impressively, the gorgeous sanctuary, which easily holds 350, was packed from pew to pew. I overheard several ushers discussing the shortage of programs for the audience – rumor had it TEMP had only printed 250 – and I thought, in regard to problems, that's among the best kind to run into.

For more than two decades, TEMP has been Austin's ambassador to lesser-known medieval, Renaissance, and baroque music, celebrating with each performance a spirit of discovery for performer and listener alike. Looking over the composers listed on the program – Posch, Vesi, Schmelzer, and Muffat, to name a few – it was exciting to bear witness to the organization's exploration of Western musical heritage.

Joining concertmistress Laurie Young Stevens and other TEMP regulars were Dutch recorder virtuoso Paul Leenhouts, Argentine violinist Manfredo Kraemer, and Boston cellist Phoebe Carrai, each an internationally celebrated master of early music performance. Leenhouts' brilliant, clear tone was triumphant in the Berardi "Canzone Sesta," driving the piece with command. In Frescobaldi's "Canzon Prima," Carrai shone, the delicate solo a calming interlude to the surrounding ensemble work. The full ensemble opened the second act with the "Sinfonia a 6" by Vitali, a balanced, memorable piece followed by Biber's wonderful "Partita III," showcasing the dual virtuosity of Kraemer and Young Stevens in the vivid opening flourish and the furious, conclusive Ciacona. The only stumble came with Biagio Marini's "Passamezzo Concertato," an exciting ode to the trill that started strong but grew rushed and frantic toward the end, a rare moment of overindulgence on the part of the performers.

The responsibility for the night's vocal work fell to soprano Jenifer Thyssen, who has focused her career on early music – fortunately for early music. First in Simone Vesi's lovely "Laudate Pueri Dominum" and then in the concert's highlight performance of pieces from *II Giardino d'Amore* by Alessandro Scarlatti (father Domenico), Thyssen's ebullient, striking vocal artistry soared above the audience. With a blend of lucid, pitch-perfect technique and glowing lyricism, Thyssen was marvelous.

At one moment in between pieces, a cell phone rang in the audience. This is usually an embarrassing and annoying moment, an unwelcome interruption to the spell cast by the performance. The ringtone, though, was an elegant classical piece, perhaps even baroque, though it was silenced too quickly to pinpoint. Not only glad to know I'm not the only one out there with a classical ringtone, I noticed the audience grin in unison, no one perturbed. It was a lighthearted accompaniment to a magical night of live music and discovery. *– Michael Kellerman*

# The Yes Men Fix the World D: Andy Bichlbaum, Mike Bonanno. (NR, 87 min.)

In case you haven't heard of the Yes Men, they are a pair of drolly indefatigable, anti-corporate pranksters whose ongoing efforts to expose and ridicule the evils inherent in an unfettered, global,

free-market economy have been the subject of a previous documentary. This new film is an excellent starting point for anyone curious about just how craven our corporate fat cats have become. In a nutshell, Bichlbaum and Bonanno, very stylish sorts well-versed in the fine art of infiltrating the highest echelons of the global power elite (read: Union Carbide, General Electric, Exxon Mobil), select a particularly egregious and vile corporate subject and then pass themselves off as knowledgeable insiders, eager to share "new, transformative of the blackest satire since Jonathan Swift's modest proposal. Their mission? The exposure of the awful yet undeniable truth about the globalized biz whiz - those continent-spanning corporate behemoths that are willing to profit at any cost, even if that cost entails the outright murder of millions of (mostly Third World) human beings in the process. The Yes Men's hyperelaborate pranks are meant to call attention to the evils that rich, white men do to middle-class and working-class white (brown, Asian, etc.) men and women. Once again in this film, they succeed in making the big boys look like bad little boys with lethal playthings and the ethics of starving hyenas. Target No. 1 is Dow Chemical (corporate slogan: "We bring good things to life!"), having recently acquired Union Carbide, whose brand was scuttled stockwise by their lead role in the world's worst-ever industrial accident in July 1984 in Bhopal, India. (Some 3,800 were killed outright with an estimated 100,000 others instantly doomed to live the brief remainder of their lives suffering from illnesses ranging from crippling emphysema to horrific birth defects. UC ended up settling out of court.) Thus, on the 25th anniversary of the Bhopal disaster, Bichlbaum and Bonanno establish a remarkably realistic (albeit fake) Dow Chemical Corporation website and issue a "landmark" press release to the effect that Dow is, finally, taking sole responsibility for UC's quartercentury-old criminal negligence. To the Yes Men's credit, not only is the faux story picked up by all of the major news feeds (Reuters, AP) but Bichlbaum, posing as a Dow executive, is also interviewed on the BBC and the news of Dow's abrupt turnabout sends their stock prices crashing into the basement. (Dow is understandably aghast.) That's but one of several cunning stunts these anti-corporate (or, more to the point, anti-"crimes against humanity") activist-provocateurs manage to pull off. One other clever gambit is so outlandish, so Swiftian in its brazen improbability, that the positive reaction it receives from the corporate side is, frankly, nauseating (think Soylent Green). Directed and edited with verve and style, the film, in the end, is unlikely to save the world per se, but the Yes Men's bravery and unflagging sense of optimistically doomed humor - which comes across as a quixotic version of Monty Python by way of Upton Sinclair - is to be applauded and, wherever possible,

Heartsick, or maybe just drunk and bitter that her baby sister got married first, single gal Beth (Bell) dives into the fountain and pockets a handful of coins, setting in motion one of the dumber plots to come down the pike in a long while (see you at next year's Razzies for sucky script honors, David Diamond and David Weissman!). Turns out that the men who threw those coins in the fountain are suddenly and rather violently smitten with Beth. The suitors are played by well-known comic actors - Arnett is a tortured artist, Shepard a preening male model, Napoleon Dynamite's Heder a goth-y illusionist, and de Vito a sausage king - and to a one they are strenuously unfunny. Bell is utterly blah (then again. she's working with talking points, not dialogue), while Duhamel, as another beau maybe under the fountain's influence, lopes through the picture like a lost but very eager puppy. The credits roll to a castwide dance sequence that plays like bad dinner theatre. DEAR JOHN D: Lasse Hallström; with Channing Tatum, Amanda Seyfried, Richard Jenkins, Henry Thomas, D.J. Cotrona, Cullen Moss, Scott Porter. (PG-13, 108 min.)

I don't mean to argue that all romantic figures in the movies should conform to the same ideal – variety is the spice of life, after all – but was the world really begging for a leading man in cropped cargo pants? Or perhaps they're XL board shorts: All I know is I spent a good chunk of *Dear John*'s first act puzzling over Tatum's lower half, sheathed as it was in material too long to pass for shorts and too short to pass for pants. It's a distraction, to be sure, but the filmmakers have helpfully included only the slimmest of story here, leaving ample time to wonder over Tatum's costuming. Based on a weepie by bestselling novelist Nicholas Sparks, Dear John frontloads its action to the beginning, in which reformed hooligan John (Tatum) is home in beachside South Carolina, on leave from the Army. He falls fast for Savannah (Seyfried, sweet but underused), a saintly type passing her academic spring break building houses with Habitat for Humanity and speculating out loud that John's shut-in dad (an affecting Jenkins) is autistic. (Turns out she's right.) When John heads back overseas to finish out his tour, he and Savannah swap letters, which are obvious, mewling, and frankly pretty boring; then 9/11 happens and changes the course of their romantic future. More stuff happens after this, and it is as ill-defined and static-seeming as

THE SOUEAKOUEL D: Betty Thomas: with Zachary Levi, David Cross, Jason Lee, Wendie Malick; with the voices of Justin Long, Matthew Gray Gubler, Jesse McCartney, Anna Faris, Christina Applegate, Amy Poehler. (PG, 88 min.)

It's a rare but not unheard-of event for a sequel to top its predecessor. This is not one of those sequels, however, and director Thomas, working from a script by returning screenwriter Jon Vitti and Kung Fu Panda scribe Jonathan Aibel, does little to improve on 2007's original "film/rebranding event." While The Squeakquel might be appreciated by filmgoers ages 10 or younger, the rest of us should be investing heavily in d-CON and working feverishly through the night to build a better rodent trap. This time out. the all-singing, all-dancing, all-CGI chipmunks - rebel with paws Alvin (Long), wise guy Simon (Gubler), and tubby emo vermin Theodore (McCartney) – wind up in a contrived "squeak-off" with a new trio of singing female chipmunks, cruelly dubbed the "Chipettes" by down-on-his-luck record exec Ian Hawk (Cross, returning from the original in search of a paycheck and not much else). It's like the Schlitz of caper movies - it goes down easily, buzzes around your brainpan for a couple of hours, and then vanishes from your memory within 24. Armored continues Antal's penchant for generic, single-word film titles, but it's such a streamlined suspenser that you can forgive the dopey bits and go with the good-men-gone-bad flow of the film. Dillon plays an armored-car guard who, together with a crew of five others (among them Fishburne, who appears to be having a ball, and The Professional's Reno), plans an inside job worth a cool \$42 million. At 162 minutes and a cost of somewhere between \$250 million and \$300 million, Cameron's ne plus ultra of futuristic mechanized mayhem and seamless CGI trickery is both a cinematically spectacular slab of virtually nonstop action and an unmistakable diatribe against corporatized American imperialism. There are the usual muscledup boys (and equally powerful girls) with big-bang toys, crying havoc and letting slip the dogs of war, to be sure, but at its heart this mammoth film is ... a chick flick. Despite a script that at times leaves its most interesting characters delivering some of the most banal lines in a Cameron film thus far, somehow it all holds together. As a purely visual experience, it's like nothing you've ever seen before: a lush, sexy, primal world created entirely by Cameron's legions of CGI masters. Writer/director Hancock (The Rookie) overcomes most of the built-in problems inherent to inspirational sports dramas. Also in the film's plus column are two standout performances: Aaron, as the sweet-mannered but largely uncommunicative football player Michael (Aaron does some very subtle body work, using the way he carries his heft as an emotional signpost), and Bullock, as the prickly, straight-talking Memphis socialite who welcomes Michael into her home and eventually makes him a part of the family. This is a dream role for Bullock - finally, a job that requires her to be adult, tart, and smart, all at once - and she makes good use of it. It's not an altogether convincing portrait, but it is an entertaining, even moving one, and the forceful-ness of her presence goes a long way in pulling the film back from the brink of cuddliness. Like its titular protagonist (a deadly smooth Washington), The Book of Eli early on sets a course and never deviates from its core mission of being an action-packed, end-of-days road movie. A war has happened some 30 years prior and sucked the color out of the sky, most of the people from the earth, and all the King James Bibles from the physical plane. The enigmatic Eli, stoic as a monk, plods along the road with his precious cargo safely tucked away inside a dusty backpack. (Everything is dusty in this film.) His occasional encounters with other human beings prove less than encouraging - bandits, cannibals, and illiterates haunt the American interstate highway system - until he arrives at a dingy little wreck of a town overseen by Carnegie (Oldman), a teapot dictator with a yen for the Good Book. Director Duffy's wickedly bloodthirsty and strangely humorous The Boondock Saints was a cult hit waiting to happen that somehow didn't. As a post-post-Tarantino hipster-shoot-'em-up, it seemed oddly dated back when it received a microrelease from Miramax before heading straight to video and developing a substantial following, in part due to the canny documentary Overnight, which chronicles the Boondock director's meteoric nonrise to and ego-fueled fall from indie cinema heaven. The original is all muzzle flash and zero smarts, but its loopy storyline, which has hard-drinking, harder-fighting Boston-Irish sibling vigilantes Connor and Murphy MacManus (Flanery and Reedus) laying waste to both the Italian and Russian mobs in modern-day Beantown, is delirious, brutish, testosterone-fueled un-fun. All Saints Day, from its dullish title on down to its final bullet, is the sort of outrageously bad filmmaking that defines the phrase "unnecessary sequel." When a small enclave of human resistance rightly senses Edward is a sympathizer, he goes off the grid to help manufacture a cure to vampirism. It's a little bit silly - as is Dafoe's Kentucky-fried cowboy mechanic named Elvis – but silly is fun. In fact, one wishes it were sillier still; *Daybreakers* is an ingeniously conceived, designed, and dressed piece, but whither the sex and the humor, huh? Certainly the source material appears, at first glance, far afield of Anderson's usual lens-finder. But instead of bending to the will of the source, Roald Dahl's 1970 children's book about a turf war between farmers and foxes, Anderson has instead made it conform rather giddily to his own sensibilities. This is an animated film that happily has room for both an existentialist dread of death and a grinning joie de vivre. Clooney voices the titular Mr. Fox, a former thief made to go straight by his wife (Streep) when they give birth to a son, Ash (Schwartzman). But Mr. Fox is too visionary and, well, prankish to stay settled down, so he masterminds one last caper. Fantastic Mr. Fox is rendered in traditional stop-motion animation – a style nearly bygone in these digital days - and both the antiquity and the laboriousness of that process are perfectly suited to Anderson. The hybridization of arthouse and action doesn't happen all that often, but it should, if mashing the two genres makes for film as riveting and rattling as The Hurt Locker. Bigelow's film tells the story of an elite bomb-dismantling squad winding down a tour of duty in Iraq. "Story" is perhaps misleading, as The Hurt Locker, very little interested in character backstory or conventional plot, charts a series of missions, some more successful than others, with only the occasional interlude of drunken roughhousing. There's no moralizing here, no monologuing about why we fight: The Hurt Locker mostly restricts its focus to dramatizing the dirty work of bomb-dismantling in a war zone, and that it does brilliantly. Plummer is delightful as this movie's master magician and impresario of the rickety Imaginarium, a traveling road show that features a mirrorlike portal into one's unconscious, but the real Parnassus here is Gilliam. In what has almost become his signature m.o., Gilliam rescues his film from the jaws of disaster - this time when his star Ledger died abruptly midway through filming. Concocting a scenario that almost works seamlessly, three actors - Depp, Farrell, and Law - were enlisted to play different aspects of Tony, the name of Ledger's character who entices people to part with their money and trip through the Imaginarium. This "continuity snafu" is not what undermines The Imaginarium of Doctor Parnassus. Instead, the problem resides with the story itself, or rather, the lack of story. Co-written with Charles McKeown, with whom Gilliam also wrote Brazil and The Adventures of Baron Munchausen, the scenario doesn't contain much activity beyond the initial setup. In It's Complicated, Streep plays Jane Adler, a Santa Barbara, Calif., restaurateur who is 10 years divorced from Jake (Baldwin) when they begin having an affair. Also present in Jane's life is Adam (Martin), the architect who is overseeing the planned expansion of her already perfect home. Many are the amusing and knowing moments in this comedy, yet the fabric of Meyers' fantasy is too gossamer to sustain the weight of their truths. Streep, who is usually so impressive, seems little more than ordinary in this work, and Martin's unique talents are sadly wasted. 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

TOOTH FAIRY D: Michael Lembeck; with Dwayne Johnson, Ashley Judd, Julie Andrews, Chase Ellison, Billy Crystal, Stephen Merchant. (PG. 102 min.)

Johnson is deeply unlikable here as Derek Thompson, an aging ice hockey player riding out his career in the minors as muscle. Life is simple in Emmerich's films. Emmerich takes the disaster-movie genre to its logical conclusion in 2012, obliterating or reconfiguring vast swaths of the planet's surface (solar storms boil the Earth's core; tectonic havoc ensues) and providing a 158-minute thrill ride that zips by like the real thing. Over the duration, there are homages (or lifts) to apocalyptic exercises of decades past (particularly When Worlds Collide) and plenty of cheeky references to Emmerich's own résumé. 2012 is PTSD - Popcorn Thrills and Sappy meloDrama - supersized to counter current real-world terrors, and it is, by turns, thrilling, ridiculous (the script, by Emmerich and longtime co-writer Harald Kloser. is riddled with howlingly goofy lines and seriously improbable deus-ex-machina moments), and just plain big, dumb fun. Either by design or default, Reitman has customed a film perfectly in tune with these economically distressed, tetchy times, which may explain the near-universal hosannas with which *Up in the Air* has been met. Reitman sets the film in motion with an opening-credit sequence that highlights how America's vistas look from up above – apropros, considering that's where "career transition counselor" Ryan Bingham (Clooney) spends most of his time. Bingham, by choice, is a man without country or close ties, but very quickly two women (Farmiga and Kendrick) arrive in his life to shake up the status quo. Reitman's instincts, of both timing and tone, can feel just a hair off in the film's imperfect first and third acts. But the middle is terrific, especially

# WHERE THE WILD

This is a freewheeling but tonally and aesthetically true adaptation of Maurice Sendak's 1963 children's book. Jonze, in collaboration with co-screenwriter Dave Eggers, seems to have tapped every primal feeling along the spectrum - joy, grief, rage, a relish for mayhem - and put it onscreen for our viewing pleasure. And a pleasure it is - the rare children's film that isn't coded for adults or made corny and flip for kids. Working with Jim Henson's Creature Shop and adapting quite literally Sendak's original etchings. Jonze has put to film what generations of children have only dreamed about: the nearness and dearness of Sendak's woolly beasts. One of the many delights of the film is in how physical it is (somebody is always pummeling somebody else and then following the beating with a bruising bear hug). There are minor grievances with the film, all technical, but they frankly feel inconsequential when put next to the film's overall effect. (10/16/2009) - Kimberley Jones ★★★★ Movies 8

# 👉 THE YOUNG VICTORIA

How young is young Victoria? At the film's beginning, she's just 17, with all the sullenness you would expect from a shut-in future queen fending off attack from her maman and prospective suitors cherry-picked by two kings. Blunt convincingly portrays the Princess Victoria as bullied and slightly silly but, most of all, desperately alone. Scriptwriter Julian Fellowes makes admirable work of shorthanding the complicated lineages and motives and manueverings. Director Vallée leans on candelight for several key scenes, and the effect is not only gorgeous but also intimates the deepening attachment between Victoria and Albert – one that was mutually felt but not spoken about plainly. (Having just earned her independence, Victoria isn't keen on giving it up again so soon.) All told, The Young Victoria is a very well-made if not especially memorable picture, moving with all the grace and stead-fastness of a waltz Victoria and Albert share, but absent any urgency or anything particularly exclama-- Kimberley Jones tory. Taken from C.D. Payne's early Nineties epistolary novel, Youth in Revolt chronicles the tortured life of Nick Twisp (Cera), a teen living mostly friendlessly in Oakland, Calif. Nick's life takes a turn for the better, however, when a family outing to a trailer park puts him in the path of Sheeni Saunders (Doubleday). She's sharp, educated, and cool to touch, at home in bikinis and Fifties shirtdresses. She drives Nick wild. Cera is fine here, and his range broadens some when Nick invents an alter ego named Francois - chain-smoking, troublemaking - because, as Nick puts it, "my one and only love wants me to be bad." Gustin Nash's script consistently delivers on situational laughs, even if he never shades in the characters beyond mere pencil sketch. And given the edgy bent of director Arteta's stand-out earlier work (The Good Girl, Chuck & Buck), there's a surprising lack of bite to the film.
