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
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Band of Outsiders

Terrence Malick's ambitious cinematic aesthetic

I still find myself starting to cry whenever I talk or think about Terrence Malick's film The Tree of Life. Even though it has now been more than a week since the Austin Film Society hosted a screening at the Paramount, my response to the film hasn't mellowed but instead seems to be intensifying. A friend suggested that perhaps the film was forcing me to finally deal with my father's death in early December 2010, which didn't affect me that much at the time. But I don't think that it is my father for whom I'm crying in any way. Rather, I think most of the tears are for me and for my childhood.

A tear or two have also been shed for these times in which we live, when there is such weak and generally empty-headed cultural criticism. During the decades when I was coming of age, there were any number of great critics. Many of them were unafraid to champion serious filmmakers whose work they admired and, in doing so, go out on critical limbs that exposed them to all kinds of cheap shots. Precious few critics still working offer any kind of vision accompanied by that kind of courage. (I do include the Chronicle critics among those few, but of course I would, so the veracity and the extent of that call is left to our readers.)

Most of the modern gang of working national film critics comes across as members of the same, very large, inbred national community with a simple, two-part critical credo:

1) It is important to be seen as representing the audience's interests and not as film fans.

2) One has a responsibility to take only the most obvious critical position on a film so as not to be too much an advocate or too esoteric in one's critical support.

(The unwritten corollary to this is to not take a position that other film critics will either offhandedly dismiss or, even worse, mock one for taking; there are a very few who will take only positions that all others find outrageous, but in their cases, it hardly demonstrates courage.)

It is accurate to point out that almost none of these critics ever has anything too kindly to say about mainstream Hollywood releases (but that has been the case for a couple of generations now). They acknowledge the consistency with which they are forced to lament the industry's failings as they also point out the extent of those failings. It is almost too easy to predict which films they will like and which ones they won't.

Still, they not only never advocate for a different cinematic aesthetic; when given opportunities to support just such alternatives, they rarely take them. Rather than desiring to change the industry's mediocrity, they are happy with it, evincing an almost obvious gratitude at the easy targets they are offered.

The attitude prized here is being cool. Being too passionate about a film, especially the wrong film, is a terrible mistake in that community.

The poster children for these modern major American film critics are those amazing Flying Wallenda brothers, Anthony Lane and David Denby, over at The New Yorker, where once Goddamn Pauline Kael herself held swav. Knowledgeable on film and culture, consistently impressive writers, they both manage to appear substantive while never deigning to actually say very much.

Lane is extremely witty, widely read, and writes with style to burn. His only noticeable failing as a film critic is that he doesn't have much of substance to say about films or filmmakers, though what he does offer he at least usually says very well. The shame is that not only does Denby have even less of consequence to say than Lane, but that he also doesn't say it nearly as well.

They both have a tendency to go glib in the face of a complicated film. "If you wait long enough, a new Terrence Malick film comes around," is the opening sentence of Lane's New Yorker review of The Tree of Life. The sentence lacks wit, meaning, and style, though it pretends to the last.

The last sentence of that paragraph – "Don't forget Edgar G. Ulmer's coruscating Detour (1945), which was shot in six days" - is stunning in how little it actually says compared to how much it appears to be saying. It really is such a desperate and extravagantly cheap act of critical sleight of hand that in comparison, one of comedian Rip Taylor's confetti-strewing, overly hysterical entrances seems measured and unusually sophisticated.

Unfortunately, the dearth of ambitious critics eventually has a negative impact on the quality of the films being made and released.

Jean-Luc Godard once argued that no matter how radical, anti-social, and revolutionary a film's narrative content, if the film was presented in a known and accepted style, it invariably ended up reinforcing and supporting dominant ideology rather than challenging it.

The most widely used, internationally known, and universally understood visual film style has long been invisible, or "Hollywood," editing. This is where the tools of cinematic language are used to mask any evidence of artificiality from viewers. The uses of cutting, camera movement, sound, and music are all designed to fool the audience members' eyes and lull their brains into believing there is a seamless continuity to what is being shown on the screen. This is not to charge conspiracy or attempt at subliminal manipulation; it is

about the audience buying into the film and believing it.

A revolutionary political filmmaker, Godard directly challenged classic visual language, ripping it apart: alternating jump cuts with long takes, having editing within sequences in the wrong order, moving the camera in such a way that it called attention to itself; not just an actor but sometimes the whole filmmaking process violated the fourth wall by interacting with the audience.

During his first decade of making films (the 1960s), Godard was regarded as revolutionary, complex, stylistically difficult, and confrontational, making films that were often too difficult for even veteran filmgoers to understand.

Now, a half-century or more after they first appeared, they seem almost quaint. Over those intervening decades, almost all of Godard's filmic innovations and distortions of cinematic language have become so widely used that, rather than being stylistically eccentric, they are now mundane. Once disruptive, they've been homogenized into the dominant visual style and are seen as often in TV commercials as anywhere.

Seeming to lack any polemical ambitions, Malick's pioneering cinematic styles have played in the opposite direction from those of Godard. Rather than a street-style deconstruction of text, Malick pushed for a richer and more elaborate cinematic language, resulting in a stunning style used to convey an exaggerated reality, a contemplation on the differences between grace and nature, between faith and belief.

Malick is of the very few directors to create a personal style so overwhelming, idiosyncratic, and unique, and his grandness of cinema derives more from a truly ambitious aesthetic drive than the pursuit of specific political goals. Instead of the tight, black-and-white, street rhythm of Godard, he has gone for the grandly opulent, a style so lush and exagger-

'Chronicle' Endorsement

Place 3 City Council run-off, June 18: Kathie Tovo

The Chronicle editorial board narrowly endorsed Kathie Tovo over incumbent Randi Shade in the general election, and nothing has happened since then to cause us to reverse that opinion for the run-off. However - as tends to be inevitable - the intervening campaigns have not been particularly edifying or inspiring, which we hope will not dampen turnout. Tovo continues to run against Formula One and rude emails instead of against her opponent, and after promising a campaign of "stark differences," Shade has drifted sideways into apparently unwinnable ethics complaints and "no growth" scare tactics. The narrowly targeted messages, alas, reflect the steady shrinkage of the Austin electorate; if you're shooting for 51% of 3% of the registered voters, there's not much need for you (or your consultants) to stretch your ideological wings to include the whole city.

To reprise: We've found Shade to be an energetic and wide-ranging council member, doing good and necessary work on social services, on clean energy, and on reforming the city's troubled historic zoning program. We were disappointed with her approach (with Chris Riley) to the Nathaniel Sanders II settlement, and we were split on her support for a new water treatment plant – just as voters are likely to split on whether it's a necessary infrastruc-

ture investment or a wasteful boondoggle.

Regarding emailgate: Some of us found Shade's public and private personas at odds and occasionally misleading; others felt that the controversy has been overblown and largely irrelevant on policy matters.

All of us applaud Tovo's dedicated public service on projects both official (Planning Commission; Austin ISD task forces) and unofficial, and anticipate that if elected, she will bring much beneficial experience to council. Her ongoing efforts to keep open central city schools would be important council assets, as would her interest in inner-city development via affordable, family-friendly neighborhood initiatives. Some of us are concerned that her approach to neighborhood issues would grant too much power to traditional neighborhood groups that tend to see any urbanizing or densifying change as a threat to homeowners; others believe that city policy defaults too readily to developer interests and that Tovo's presence will be a bulwark against such encroachment.

In short, to repeat our original recommendation (posted in full online): While as a group we remain somewhat split on our judgments of both Shade and Tovo, our consensus remains that Tovo is narrowly the best choice in this race.

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ated it is damn near ever impossible to just sink into his filmmaking, though it is the most overflowing of styles. It is always work to watch a Malick film.

Stylistically, I can think of no contemporary working filmmaker besides Malick who is so close aesthetically to such geniuses of silent cinema as F.W. Murnau, Maurice Tourneur, Clarence Brown, and G.W. Pabst. But Malick's work is neither complacent nor reactionary. Rather, no other director so completely delivers the very distancing Godard sought. Watch, for example, Malick's The Thin Red Line and Steven Spielberg's Saving Private Ryan. The latter opens with as brilliant a half-hour depiction of war as can be found in the cinema, but then it immediately reverts to a brilliantly done but all-too-classic Hollywood war movie. The Thin Red Line constantly offers contradictions, between silence and the noises of war, between the natural and the violent. It never provides a convenient, generic structure that allows one to slip into just watching a war film the way one has always watched war films.

And then there is The Tree of Life, a film about which there are so many different, intriguing, and exciting ways to talk, not one of which is enriched in any way by sharing how long it took Edgar Ulmer to make Detour.


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SHADE MAKES MISLEADING ASSERTIONS

Randi Shade's statements on Water Treatment Plant No. 4 in the Michael King interview last week contain several false assertions that she should know are not true ["'An Independent Person," News, June 3]. Opposition to WTP4 was never about opposing growth. All of the many groups opposing the plant have argued, with facts to back it up, that we have plenty of treatment capacity on the ground now to handle growth for many years to come. Spending hundreds of millions now - more than a billion dollars counting interest - will force skyrocketing water rates for zero benefit to anyone except the contractors building the plant - and the politicians whose campaigns they bankroll.

Shade and WTP4 supporters ignore the fact that we just completed a 67-million-gallon-per-day expansion to the Ullrich Water Treatment Plant in 2007 at a cost of \$85 million. Immediately starting WTP4 at 50 MGD and more than \$600 million in cost is nothing short of a shameful rip-off of water ratepayers, both residents and businesses.

Keeping water rates affordable, especially for small businesses and lower-income residents, is important for economic growth and social equity; building a plant we don't need at an exorbitant cost hurts our economy and those who can least afford it. And that's before you even talk about the immeasurable environmental damage the plant will cause.

- Austin's barreling toward the finish on two fronts: City Council is under pressure to sign onto a "risk-free" deal that would bring Formula One to town, and early voting is under way for the June 18 council run-off as candidates Kathie Tovo and incumbent Randi Shade sharpen their get-out-the-vote messages one of which happens to be Tovo's warning flag against allowing Formula One to drink from the taxpayer trough. See voting info and our endorsement, p.9, and "City Hall Hustle," p.18.
- As he's done in fiercely contested council run-offs past, former Texas Monthly Publisher **Mike Levy** has again saturated tens of thousands of households with a 1,500-words-plus, single-spaced letter designed to strike fear in the hearts of Austin voters. Levy opens with a plea to vote against Kathie Tovo because, in addition to a litany of dozens of other perceived threats (crime! thirst! mediocrity!), she would threaten "any hope of bringing sanity to Austin government." The one threat to Levy the letter doesn't mention? His treasured seat on the city's **Public Safety Commission**, a position he holds as an appointee of Randi Shade.
- As extreme drought conditions continue, new seasonal temperature records are being set across the state. The thermometer hit 103 degrees at Camp Mabry on June 6 – the earliest date in the year to ever reach that high at the West Austin weather station.
- It's time for a dip, and municipal pools have shifted to a summer schedule, but there's a hitch: The Parks and Recreation Department announced that the Bartholomew Municipal, Brentwood, and Shipe pools will stay closed for repairs, and that a number of pools could be closed for good next summer due to budget restraints.
- The special legislative session continues and expands: Debates on Medicaid and education finance were scheduled for June 8, but Gov. Rick Perry has thrown a monkey wrench into the serious business by adding multiple immigration-related bills to the call. See "Special Session on a Binge," p.28.
- Wednesday, June 8, marked the third anniversary of the arson that destroyed the historic Governor's Mansion, which was undergoing restoration work at the time. Investigators have yet to resolve the mystery.
- Austin ISD is getting closer to opening a school for young boys with the June 2 announcement of a seven-year, \$4.6 million grant from the Galvestonbased Moody Foundation. However, AISD board President Mark Williams said that trustees have not yet voted to open such an academy, and at this point no location has been discussed.
- ▶ Del Valle ISD trustees on June 7 appointed Kelly Crook, the district's assistant superintendent of finance and business operations, as interim superintendent after Superintendent Bernard Blanchard and Assistant Superintendent Sandra Dowdy quit the district. The two had been in a long-running feud with trustee Richard Franklin, who has said that they campaigned against his election.
- ➤ After campuswide protests, UT has rehired adjunct professor Sarah Weddington the attorney who won the pivotal Roe v. Wade reproductive rights case. Weddington, who has lectured at UT since 1986, was one of the huge number of adjuncts, as well as teaching and research assistants, who were let go as part of the state's massive funding cuts.
- Attack of the Central Texas psychic: Law enforcement in Liberty County near Houston is hunting for a woman with a 512 area code after her tip about a mass grave turned out to be nonsense. Police raided the alleged crime scene after the unnamed woman claimed to be a psychic.

Muffling the Monitor

Frasier's reviews send salutary ripples through the APD pond

As they say in paramilitary circles, Police Monitor Margo Frasier has certainly hit the ground running. Starting in January, she's already managed to ruffle feathers at City Hall, the Austin Police Department, and the Austin Police Association. When she was selected by City Manager Marc Ott, there was some grumbling that, as a former Travis County Sheriff, she might be perceived as too close to the police to be an objective observer.

So far, that ain't a problem.

Instead, with a series of no-nonsense reviews of recent APD actions, Frasier has gotten crossways with both APD Chief Art Acevedo and APA President Wayne Vincent; partly as a consequence, Acevedo and Vincent have exchanged harsh words, and in the bargain, Vincent and his Vice President Mike Bowen have had a falling-out over the most effective way to respond to what they see as Frasier's biting off more of the police union contract than they think she should be allowed to chew.

All in all, not a bad five months' work.

Among the problems with Leal's case - and there are many. argues Babcock, including bad trial-level lawyering and the state's current opposition to new DNA testing – is the fact that Leal, a Mexican national, was never afforded consular access after his arrest contrary to international law codified in the Vienna Convention, to which the U.S. is a signatory. This is not the first time the issue has come up. In 2004, the International Court of Justice ruled that the U.S. had violated the law in the cases of 54 Mexicans - including Leal. Then-President George W. Bush asked Texas courts to take heed of the decision, but that did not happen, and in 2008 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in another Texas death case that it would take an act of Congress to force the state courts to abide by the decision. With the support of the Obama administration, that's on the horizon, argues Babcock, so executing Leal now would again deny him due process. Leal has gained support from a variety of circles - including former judges and prosecutors, retired military leaders, former diplomats, and State Department officials, along with associations representing Americans living abroad. "When the United States violates the Vienna Convention, it encourages other nations to do the same," argues Babcock, "especially when dealing with American nationals." - THE WORLD IS YOUR PRECINCT If you've enjoyed the convenience of early voting here in Texas, you may have wondered: Why can't it be this easy on election day? During early voting, of course, you can vote at any polling place in the county, but on election day, you have to vote in your neighborhood precinct a hassle if you're trying, say, to squeeze voting in before or after work. Travis County Clerk Dana DeBeauvoir hopes to switch to a system of election day "vote centers" in which

countywide polling places function just like early voting polls. She hopes the centers would make election day more convenient, give the county greater flexibility in where it sets up booths (and allow it to operate fewer polling places), and eliminate voter confusion about where



to vote: "For the November 2010 election, more than 80% (5,747) of the phone calls we received were from persons asking for the location of their precinct polling place," she wrote to the Travis County Commissioners Court in an April 18 presentation. DeBeauvoir envisions a limited-scale launch of the concept for this November's elections, but first she needs to get approval from the Texas secretary of state, and before that, she must engage the public: There will be a **public hearing** before the Commissioners Court on Tuesday, June 21 (Ned Granger Building, 314 W. 11th), or you can phone the Travis County Elections Division at 854-4996; mail at PO Box 149325, Austin, 78714-9325; email at election@co.travis.tx.us; or comment at www.facebook.com/traviscountyelections. – Lee Nichols

F1 strangers bearing gifts offer council a 'risk-free' deal BY WELLS DUNBAR

Formula One is one high-stakes, fast-paced, expensive endeavor. And that's just for City Council.

That was the takeaway from council's careening conversation over F1's arrival in Austin, and more specifically, the terms under which the city would trigger the state's **Major Events Trust Fund** into luring the international racing event.

The discussion, held at council's Tuesday work session, presages a similar vetting of the subject at council's full meeting today (Thursday, June 9). With the **Circuit of the Americas** racetrack under construction and the British **Formula One Management** having selected Austin to start racing in June 2012, it might look like everything's in place. But to sanction the event, F1 boss **Bernie Ecclestone** demands some \$25 million in annual franchise fees. Those funds would be paid from the state's Major Events Trust Fund, but with a proportional match of local tax dollars, presumably captured from the additional tax dollars generated by F1's (and its spectators') arrival in Austin.

Leaving alone the broader questions – like whether it's appropriate to publicly fund an overseas sporting monopolist when the state is slashing basic services at home – council's questions focused on ways to hold the city harmless should those additional, F1-generated tax dollars not rain down like Pennzoil from heaven.

Fittingly, the twisting, turning discussion began with a note from Assistant City Manager **Sue Edwards**, who oversees the Economic Growth and Redevelopment Services Office, that, in fact, the prescribed order of the Major Events Trust Fund-tapping discussions had been upended. Normally, the sponsoring city is the one to apply to the state for assistance; in this "somewhat backwards" case, said Edwards, the city was approached by the state and race organizers in hopes they'd agree to serve as the sponsoring municipality.

Regardless of the promises state Comptroller Susan Combs or Gov. Rick Perry may or may not have made to Ecclestone, local F1 team Full Throttle Productions, represented by über-attorney Richard Suttle, endeavored to depict the agreement as risk-free to the city. The state pays in cash to the events fund but requires a \$1-to-\$6.25 local match, ostensibly generated by F1-initiated taxes and fees the city wouldn't otherwise realize. In this case, that comes to a \$25 million/\$4 million split, with Full Throttle (as "local organizing committee") offering to kick in the first, prerace \$4 million. (According to Edwards, the city would be reimbursed for other expenses after the first race, when the fund has been replenished; it should supposedly continue that way for the 10 years of a post-first-year agreement. However, it's worth noting that any disbursement to the city is dependent on Combs' estimate - a topic we'll get to shortly.)

Suttle, there on behalf of the local team, repeatedly reminded council the city had to contribute nothing to the fund up front. But asked by Mayor **Lee Leffingwell**, "Is there ever any risk that the city would have to spend any extra money more than it is reimbursed on this event?" – presumably if the tax revenues aren't in line with projections – Suttle conceded "that answer is still open. Our goal is to get it to where it's revenue neutral," adding, "the city spends lots of money to hold other events that are near and dear to our heart, South by Southwest included." (Decidedly not in the realm of a \$4 million sales tax capture, but I'll let him take that up with my boss.) Perhaps reconsidering his initial response, Suttle later qualified it, predicting F1 would be "at worst case revenue neutral ... best case, revenue positive multiple times over."

But what if the money's there – but it's more the city's than F1's? That question hovered over the meeting's testi-

est exchange, beginning with Leffingwell emphatically insisting: "The city will never put any money into this project. The money that comes out in subsequent years comes from the inflow from the previous event. But the city doesn't supplement that. If it doesn't come up to be enough, then it's not going to meet performance standards and most likely the state's not going to participate."

"Mayor, you have a higher belief in the value of economic studies than I do," countered **Bill Spelman**.

"If the economic studies are bad, and it doesn't happen, then the race doesn't happen," said Leffingwell.

To which Spelman replied, "There still is an article of faith here – that the economic study fairly represents how much money is coming into to the city's coffers that otherwise would not be there."

Lots of questions to answer – and not much time. Council action on approving yet-to-be-drafted agreements with both the state and Full Throttle is tentatively scheduled for a June 23 hearing. A preliminary economic analysis – performed not by the city but by Full Throttle's contractor – hasn't landed at City Hall yet. (**Sheryl Cole** called on the city to scrub the analysis, noting, "It's one thing to get a report; it's another thing to get a report from the people that are seeking your participation.")

The tight timeline, undrafted agreements, and unorthodox initiation of the process all raise eyebrows. (Suttle admitted, "My clients are betting on the fact that you're going to feel that this is such a good deal for the community" – otherwise, they wouldn't have started building the track already.) None of that means F1 shouldn't come here. But as Cole said in her closing remarks: "We've never done a deal this big. So we've got to nail it."

Drop That Finger

In the aftermath, the official dispute has become less about Frasier's specific recommendations than about whether she had the right to make any recommendations at all under the terms of the police union contract that created the Office of the Police Monitor and the Citizen Review Panel. Tangentially, Vincent and Acevedo have exchanged angry charges that each is meddling in the other's business, while Vincent told members that union VP Bowen was undermining the union by talking to Frasier (and the media) and preparing to file a contract grievance against the OPM without first getting approval from Vincent.

It's the union's position that the contract allows the monitor to make recommendations only concerning "critical incidents" (involving death or serious injury) and then only through the CRP - the SWAT incident apparently wouldn't qualify. But the contract isn't entirely explicit on the monitor's limitations, and Frasier (following advice from city attorneys) says she believes she's acting within the job's parameters. "I feel very confident," she told me, "that the monitor can make recommendations" in these circumstances.

The union disagrees, and Bowen has filed a grievance, now making its way through the process. But Vincent bristled that Bowen had apparently acted without his express approval, and (in a letter to members) blamed Acevedo, saying, "We certainly have enough on our plate without having to perform every political errand in the manner that is dictated by the Chief." Acevedo responded with a letter to all APD personnel, saying he had simply done his job by informing union officials (including Vincent) of Frasier's memo and subsequent media inquiries, adding, "Clearly, I do not need anybody to carry my or the Department's water at city hall or in any political arena and I am disappointed that an attempt to protect the rights of departmental employees would be characterized as such." Acevedo wrote that he does believe Frasier "may have exceeded the scope of [the OPM's] authority," but told me that he didn't solicit a grievance from anybody, and that the contract dispute is a matter to be settled between "the APA, the city manager, and the city."

Words to the Wise

Publicly at least, everybody says they're now on the same page, including Frasier, who told me that she's content to abide by whatever is finally decided on the contract - "We all need to know what are the rules that I should apply." Bowen says if the grievance is rejected, the next contract negotiations should clarify the matter, and as to any disputes within the union, he's taking "the high road" and following the defined process. Vincent concurred, adding that while he thought the initial dispute was handled "too quickly and too publicly" (his letter to members takes several shots at the media), the grievance process is now proceeding as it should.

It's no coincidence that we're entering union election season and that Bowen has been suggested as a potential challenger to Vincent. Bowen told me only he's happy with the job he already has. (I suspect we haven't heard the end of that part of the story.)

It's the union's position, as Vincent put it, that you can't have "two chiefs deciding policy," and that Frasier airing her thoughts on discipline risks not just violating the contract but also exposing the city to broader legal liabilities - one should only expect the union to defend its reading of the contract. It's also understandable that the chief finds it dismaying when somebody disagrees with him; most of us do.

But whatever else happens, it would be a loss to the city if the result determines that Frasier must pull in her horns and issue recommendations only indirectly, buffered by a citizens' panel whose opinions on these matters are important and substantive but finally untrained. Thus far her review memos have been attentive, thoroughly researched, and undoubtedly helpful to anybody in an APD policy position sufficiently willing to listen. Her opinions don't have the force of law, but they should certainly be allowed the force of persuasion.

It would be a shame to lose them.

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Place 3 War of Words: Historic Zoning, WTP4

With early voting under way for the Place 3 run-off and lots of ground to make up, embattled incumbent **Randi Shade** has apparently settled on her closing arguments against general election front-runner **Kathie Tovo** – her challenger's Planning Commission vote in a controversial **historic zoning** case and her statement that, had she been on council at the time, she would have voted against **Water Treatment Plant No. 4**.

The weekend before the Monday start of early voting, Shade emailed supporters a video describing Tovo's role in the on the Bradford-Nohra saga, a contentious historic zoning case campaign initiated against owner Helen Nohra's wishes that spanned three years and included a trip to the courthouse. As the Chronicle has reported over the years, the case was a comedy of errors that saw shifting staff recommendations and a court case that threatened to upend several other board and commission decisions for not complying with supermajority requirements required in a board and commission cleanup. (See "The Battle Over This Old House," June 12, 2009, and "Bradford-Nohra Ruling Leads to Sequel," Aug. 27, 2010.)

The Shade video fast-forwards to Tovo's work on the **Planning Commission** in January 2011, when (the video says) Tovo "led an effort to force historic zoning on Nohra's house against the family's wishes." It also quotes Nohra's nephew, real estate attorney **Jim Nassour**, as saying Tovo "felt strong[ly] enough to displace a 99-year-old woman out of her home on information that she didn't even have," and other family members thank Shade for her assistance in leading a council vote to deny historic zoning.

However, the Tovo campaign posted a response over the weekend, noting that it was Shade who initially made the motion for historic zoning on the site the first time it came to council in 2009. Without directly addressing the Helen Nohra angle, the Tovo campaign writes that, despite Shade's initial approval: "Almost two years later, when Shade was running for re-election in January 2011, the winds had apparently changed. Shade then abandoned her earlier position

and voted against zoning the same property as historic, despite pleas from prominent local architects and historians to preserve the home. In short, Shade was for historic zoning before she was against it." The Tovo response also notes that initial decisions in the sprawling case predated Tovo's appointment to the Planning Commission.

Shade hits on an older campaign theme in a new TV spot, the first negative clip of the race (unless you count Tovo's earlier, **Formula One**-allergic ad): Water Treatment Plant No. 4, which, during the general campaign, Shade endeavored to turn from a negative into a positive.

In interviews with the *Chronicle* and elsewhere, Tovo has declined to offer a definitive answer as to whether she would act to stop construction of the plant if elected. The Shade clip plays up Tovo's original stance against the plant, intoning over grainy disaster footage that "in the midst of one of the worst Texas droughts ... Tovo would leave Austin dry and dangerous." (It's worth noting, however, that the drought, and its effect on Lake Travis, is one of the reasons WTP4 opponents cite for objecting to the plant.) Shade adds further claims that Tovo's potential opposition to completing the plant could cost the city the mil-

lions already invested in construction, plus legal fees resulting from any stoppage.

Online, Tovo continues to stand by her WTP4 response in a section of her website called "Setting the Record Straight." Reiterating that she would not have voted to build the plant, she continues: "However, the City Council did vote 4-3 to proceed ... and construction on the project has already begun. The City has now spent more than \$115 million of taxpayer money on this project, and I will protect the taxpayers' investment. ... Should the question come before the City Council again, please be assured that I will evaluate all information and seek to understand the full economic and legal implications before casting any vote."

The allegations raised by Shade, who trailed Tovo by 4,300 votes and more than

13 percentage points on election night, are indicators of her search for support outside the neighborhood factions that can dominate local elections, especially in an offyear, non-mayoral contest like 2011's. In the text that accompanies the Bradford-Nohra video online, Shade quadruples down on her anti-neighborhood-association rhetoric. under the assumption those votes are likely lost to her anyway, running against former Austin Neighborhoods Council leader Tovo. "What happens if it's your home that you need to modify to care for an elderly parent, or welcome a new child?" Shade asks. "Will my opponent listen to your needs, or will she put a neighborhood association's wishes above yours, without even allowing you to make your case?"

So Many Elections, So Little Time

And now for some completely different election news: A seemingly innocuous Texas Senate bill, passed and awaiting the governor's signature, may drastically affect Austin's local elections, even extending the terms of the mayor and three City Council members by six months.

Senate Bill 100, legislation from San Antonio Dem **Leticia Van de Putte**, was drafted to bring the state in line with federal law requiring that federal ballots be delivered to military and overseas voters at least 45 days before an election. It preserves Texas' current March primary date, while postponing potential primary run-offs to the fourth Tuesday in May, so as to meet the 45-day requirement.

But the measure could be difficult to enact for those Texas cities, Austin included, that hold city council elections in May. Many doubt the **Travis County Clerk's Office** has the budget and resources to stage a federal party primary, a run-off, and a city election within such a tight a time period – as could happen in 2012's mayoral election. The **Texas**



Municipal League warns about SB 100's consequences on its website: "A county elections administrator who finds the task of reprogramming and calibrating electronic voting machines in the spring of even-numbered years too onerous may refuse to provide machines or otherwise assist with the city election on that date. Realistically, this means that many

cities may still have to move their elections to the November date under the amended version of S.B. 100."

"It would seem that we're not going to have an election in May 2012," Mayor **Lee Leffingwell** told the *Chronicle*, noting he's spoken with Travis County Clerk **Dana DeBeauvoir** on the possibility of preserving a May election, "and she said she can't do it."

So what does that mean for the next general council election? Leffingwell says he plans to run for re-election in 2012, and Places 2, 5, and 6 – held by **Mike Martinez**, **Bill Spelman**, and **Sheryl Cole**, respectively – are also up for grabs that year. The mayor is proposing that, should SB 100 come to pass, those terms be extended and put up for a vote in November 2012. "It's my understanding the law that does this also authorizes city councils to extend council members' terms to the next election date," Leffingwell said.

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'Tire Slasher' Suspect Gets Day in Court

Next Wednesday, Tommy Joe Kelley – aka Tommy Joe Adams - will appear at yet another pretrial hearing to help determine if he is in fact the Hyde Park Tire Slasher, or at least the most likely possessor of the tools of the trade. Hyde Park residents say Kelley, a 56-year-old homeless man with a white, fire-and-brimstone beard and an uncanny gift for getting himself arrested, is the man responsible for some 1,000 tire slashings, puncturings, and slicings in their neighborhood over the last 16 years. Travis County prosecutors, meanwhile, are sticking with what think they can prove, charging Kelley with five felony counts of unlawful use of a **criminal instrument**.

The instrument, or rather instruments, in question - handmade 4-inch pieces of metal sharpened at one end and bent into a "U" shape at the other – were found on Kelley's person during several different arrests since March 8, 2009, when he was arrested for using the tool to puncture tires on two vehicles. In February 2010 and September 2010, Kelley was arrested for possession of marijuana, and during incidental searches, he was found to be in possession of similar tools. Finally, on Dec. 31, 2010, Kelley was spotted sitting on a curb in Hyde Park fashioning a metal tool. According to an affidavit filed by APD Detective Eric Hoduski on Feb. 17, "This tool appeared to be incomplete and Kellev was in the process of sharpening the pointed end and bending the flat end."

Hoduski's affidavit claims that Kelley's possession of those instruments on those occasions - along with his "past arrests for tire slashings and/or puncturings, his total disregard for property rights and his consistent and repetitive course of action over the past 16 years" - shows his intent to use those tools to carry out acts of criminal mischief, "his crime of choice."

In other words, and to the dismay of many Hyde Park residents, Kelley isn't being tried for the acts of criminal mischief themselves - which, taken together, could add up to decades in prison – but rather for having on his person an instrument police say was intended for acts of criminal mischief similar to those perpetrated on the tires of Hyde Park. Unlawful use of a criminal instrument is punishable by up to two years in prison or five years' probation.

Hoduski says that using the criminal instrument law is the most effective tool law enforcement has to deal with a suspect who has never actually been spotted perpetrating a felony act of criminal mischief misdemeanor yes, but not felony. In order to be a felony, an act of criminal mischief must result in \$1,500 worth of damage or more, and there just simply isn't enough evidence to prove with certainty that Kelley was the man behind all of those thousands of dollars worth of damage.

And this despite the fact that Hoduski, during the month he spent investigating the case, discovered 18 tire-spiking incidents between Jan. **Tommy Joe** 1, 2008, and Jan. 1, 2011, that corresponded with the release dates of Kelley from jail - and 13 periods with few or no reports correlating to times Kelley was in jail. That kind of circumstantial evidence may sound compelling, Hoduski says, but it won't prove in a court of law the kind of felonious criminal mischief some victims would like to see.

What the detective does feel confident about, however, is that the District Attorney's Office can prove with certainty that Kelley had criminal instruments in his possession on several different occasions and had the intent to use them for criminal purposes, which is all the Texas Penal Code requires.


"On several occasions over the years, he was charged with criminal mischief for tire slashing, but they were always misdemeanors," Hoduski says. "If we were charging him with mischief, [our evidence] would be circumstantial, but he

> was caught red-handed. It's not circumstantial. We have the tool, we have him with the tool, and we have him possessing, using, or manufacturing the tool." And while trying Kelley for holding an instrument might feel like trying Al Capone for tax evasion, when it comes to the law, all

you've got is what you can prove.

As it turns out, in order to prove anything, Travis County prosecutor Jason English will have to match wits with Kelley himself when the trial starts June 15. After he was charged, Kelley – who many in Hyde Park say they've seen speed-walking through their neighborhood, yelling incoherently, and throwing rocks at buildings, and who has had 500 separate run-ins with APD was determined by a court-appointed psychiatrist to be mentally competent to stand trial - although presumably, Kelley's mental state might well be a cen-

tral question at issue. But since the law states that if you're mentally able to stand trial, you're legally allowed to represent yourself in that trial, 390th Criminal District Court Judge Julie Kocurek has no choice but to allow Kelley to act as his own legal counsel – just what the accused Hyde Park Tire Slasher was hoping for. - Josh Rosenblatt






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The State's Planned Parenthood Trap

Today (Thursday) the state's **Health and Human Services Commission**'s Medical
Care Advisory Committee is set to hear public input on a proposed rule that would eliminate **Planned Parenthood** from providing services under the successful **Women's Health Program**. Although there seems little doubt that the rule will go through and be implemented later this year, whether it will get the blessing of the federal government is another story.

In a not-so-unexpected move, on June 1, the administrator of the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** penned a memo to state officials in Indiana to say that their recently enacted scheme to cut PP from receiving any federal Medicaid funding to pro-

vide basic health care services would not pass legal muster. "We assume this decision is not unexpected," Dr. Donald Berwick, the CMS administrator, wrote.

Indiana sought to cut PP out of funding – as lawmakers have tried to do here – because in addition to basic preventative care it provides to thousands of low-income women in Indiana, the nearly 100-year-old nonprofit also provides, with private funds, legally protected abortion services. (No federal funds can be used to pay for abortions except in extremely limited circumstances.) The new Indiana law "would eliminate the ability of Medicaid beneficiaries to receive services from specific providers for reasons not related to their qualifications to provide such services," Berwick wrote. "Medicaid

programs may not exclude qualified health care providers from providing services that are funded under the program because of a provider's scope of practice." There's no doubt that unless Texas changes its tune pertaining to PP, the state will receive a similar letter from the federal agency.


In addition to making drastic cuts to the state's family-planning budget, the state, at the behest of Sen. Robert Deuell, R-Greenville, is reworking its definition of the word "affiliate" in order to cut PP out of providing health services to women enrolled in the WHP, a Medicaid-waiver program that in 2008 alone saved the state \$40 million in Medicaid costs. The program enrolls women for services who wouldn't otherwise be eligible for Medicaid unless they were pregnant. This is no small issue considering that more than half of all the state's births are paid for by Medicaid at a cost in 2009 alone of \$2.7 billion. Currently, PP provides services for some 40% of program patients.

Nonetheless, the HHSC has drafted a new definition of "affiliate" that would ban the state from contracting for WHP services with any provider that also provides elective abortion care. That means PP in general, regardless of whether individual clinics actually provide any abortion services, would be cut from participation - a move that Attorney General Greg Abbott has said should be legal but which seems questionable especially in light of the Indiana memo. The real question is what the state will do if it is told that the new plan to cut PP out of providing services doesn't fly: Unlike the plan to cut PP out of all Medicaid services in Indiana, Texas is seeking to cut PP from a Medicaid-waiver program, a program that must be approved by the feds. The WHP got the nod of the

federal government for its first five years, but whether the feds will sign off on the program again with new restrictions seems unlikely. That would leave the state with a choice: dump the new definition of "affiliate" or dump the program. Given state law-makers' attitude toward women's health issues, it seems safe to bet that they would be more inclined to dump the program. The situations in Texas and Indiana are "definitely related," says **Sarah Wheat**, interim co-CEO of Planned Parenthood of the Texas Capital Region, "but how it all plays out, I don't know." — *Jordan Smith*

God Hates Perry?

First it looked like Gov. Rick Perry wanted to become President Perry. Now it seems he is becoming Pastor Perry. On June 5, the governor announced that he's making Aug. 6 "a day of prayer and fasting for our nation's challenges," and he has booked Houston's Reliant Stadium for an event he has dubbed the Response. While Perry's staff claimed that this is a "non-denominational, apolitical, Christian prayer service," the key organizers include his former speechwriter Eric Bearse, former Republican Party of Texas Executive Director Wayne Hamilton, and several groups specializing in mobilizing fundamentalist religious voters for Republican candidates. Still, even with noted anti-gay marriage campaigners like the American Family Association and the Skyline Wesleyan Church on board, the event is not fundamentalist enough for one group of evangelical homophobes. Margie Phelps, daughter of Westboro Baptist Church's Fred Phelps, tweeted that the extremist group will take a break from its normal schedule of disrupting military funerals, synagogues, and gay rights parades to "picket [the] phony 'prayer' political rally." - Richard Whittaker

















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Five Districts, No Representation?

Really, what Tom DeLay needed back in 2003 was more districts.

Eight years ago, the former U.S. House majority leader and now convicted felon tried hard to stick it to liberal Austin - and especially its Congressman Lloyd

Doggett – when he persuaded the state Legislature to engage in an unprecedented mid-decade redistricting. But DeLay couldn't quite pull it off. He did chop up Travis County three ways - putting most of us under Republican representation but Doggett stayed in office.

This time, armed with four new districts - and thus more ways to chop and slice - Republicans are poised to make DeLay's dreams come true. On Monday, the state Senate passed a redistricting plan that will carve up Travis five ways, and with the GOP holding a 101-seat supermajority in the House, there's probably nothing Democrats can do to stop it - not in the Lege, anyway.

And here's the really scary part: It's entirely possible that the capital city of Texas could end up with not one of its residents serving in Congress. That's because none of the five districts has a majority of its population in Travis County. Under the plan as currently configured, Travis County does best in District 10, with 35% of the population; from there, it just gets worse, down to 19% for District 17.

Travis County citizens and elected officials alike pleaded last week to the House and Senate redistricting

committees to keep Travis as whole as possible, since the county easily has enough population to have one district completely within county borders. But with the GOP in control, the pleas fell on willfully deaf ears.

Complaining that Travis was only being used to fill out population requirements of

anchor for one of its own, Austin Sen. Kirk Watson told the Senate committee, "Travis County citizens ... shouldn't be the salvage yard of a congressional redistricting

Watson called the map a "systematic effort to silence voices of the people that are living in Travis County." He also said it tramples on minority voters in Travis, splitting up coalitions formed in East Austin that have allowed minorities to successfully elect candidates of their choice (an ability protected by the Voting Rights Act).


Asked why Travis got cut up the way it did, Sen. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, replied to the committee that it was simply a matter of finding equal population for 36 districts while still complying with the Voting Rights Act.

> That's baloney, of course. Two redistricting reform activists. A.J. Pate of Houston and Bill Owens of San Antonio, produced maps that leave Austin almost completely whole while still coming up with at least as many "minority opportunity districts" as Seliger's map. Owens complained to the committee that Seliger's map is a "blatant Republican gerrymander."

> "This outrageous scheme would do immeasurable harm to our community and the values that set it apart as such a unique place in which to work and live," said Doggett, the map's target. "I

believe the crooked lines of this map will be rejected [by the courts] as a blatant violation of the Voting Rights Act."

On a statewide level, minority advocacy groups, such as the Mexican American **Legal Defense and Education Fund** and the **League of United Latin American Citizens.**



complained that the plan fails to significantly increase the number of Hispanic opportunity districts, if at all. That's despite the fact that nearly 90% of Texas' population growth over the past decade was among racial minorities, and most of that was Latino. Like Doggett, they predicted the map wouldn't pass the Voting Rights Act test in court, which protects minority opportunity districts.

In the House committee, Joey Cardenas of LULAC said he was against the map and told Republicans, "I don't blame y'all for hiding [the map] until Tuesday," just two days before the committee hearing. "This is how we do redistricting in Texas. We make an attempt, we fail at that attempt, and we go to court."

In the Senate committee, Sen. Mario **Gallegos** marveled that despite the Hispanic growth, "The proposed plan ... would actually allow Anglo voters to control three additional districts." He claimed that this was achieved

by packing many Hispanics into a few districts, while dividing up the rest of the Latino population into ineffective minorities of other districts. Speaking on the latter, he quoted an anonymous Latino activist as saying, "We are tired in Dallas of being everyone's 30 percent bitch."

The map, with only minor amendments, passed the Senate 18-12 and has been referred to the House committee.

Reviving Bipartisanship

Could we bring a stop to these decennial (and sometimes more) congressional redistricting debacles? Not bloody likely.

Trying to show the way, however, are Republican Sen. Jeff Wentworth of San Antonio (whose district includes part of Austin) and Democrats Rep. Donna Howard of Austin and Sen. José Rodríguez of El Paso.

Wentworth has umpteen times over the past couple of decades filed legislation to take congressional redistricting out of the partisan hands of the Lege and turn it over to a bipartisan commission. And it has failed that many times, including in the regular session that just ended. But Wentworth has brought it back in the special session as Senate Bill 22. The commission would be composed of nonofficeholders and noncandidates - four Republicans and four Democrats appointed by the Lege, with a ninth member selected by the eight.

Rodríguez filed a bill (SB 32) that would establish a set of principles for congressional redistricting, with Howard filing the House companion (House Bill 65). The pair also filed resolutions that would do the same thing (Senate Joint Resolution 1 and House Joint Resolution 12) but would need voter approval as a constitutional amendment before taking effect.

The Rodriguez/Howard bill would require that "communities of interest" be kept intact, districts be compact and contiguous, unnecessary division of cities and counties be avoided, and partisan data not be used.

Now, place a bet on whether they'll pass. If they do, the payout will be huge. - L.N.



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


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School Funding Bill 'Could Have Been Worse'



Special Session on a Binge

You have to hand it to Senate Finance Committee Chair **Steve Ogden**. The Bryan Republican warned that the legislative **special session** would grow as Gov. **Rick Perry** added more and more issues to the call. In less than two weeks, Perry has expanded the call of issues eligible for discussion three times, each time adding more conservative red meat to the mix and further derailing lawmakers' vacation plans. The Legislature originally came back on May 31 – the day after the regular session ended – to hack at education funding and Medicaid payments. By the end of the first day, Perry had added congressional redistricting to the call. Then, on June 3, after having disrupted attempts to settle Texas Windstorm Insurance Association reform during the regular session, Perry dumped that piece of unfinished business on the to-do list. Four days later he added a panoply of immigration issues, including tougher driver's license regulations, enforcement of the federal Secure Communities Program, and a ban on sanctuary cities. Fortunately for the governor, and completely by coincidence, a slew of bills covering those issues had already been prefiled before he extended the call.

There is bad news, good news, and worse news for the **Austin Independent School District** in the Legislature.

First, the bad news: If the current school funding proposals pass, the district will face a cut in state funding over the next biennium. The good news: The cuts are not as bad as initially feared. Under the provisions of Senate Bill 1 – scheduled for House debate today, June 9 – AISD would lose \$37 million for the upcoming school year and \$58 million for 2012-13. That's dramatically less than the \$94 million prediction the administration had been working toward, and the 2011-12 cut will be further offset by the district's \$14 million slice of the state's **federal EduJobs** allotment. AISD board of trustees President


Mark Williams said, "It sure could have been worse."
With savings already made from cutting staff and operational efficiencies, he added, "That takes the budget deficit roughly to break-even" for 2011-12.

SB 1 is not the only education bill scheduled for Thursday's debate. SB 2 must also pass to release the state's \$37 billion general revenue appropriation for public schools for the next biennium. Schools also need House Bill 6 to pass, creating the new instructional materials allotment and releasing just under a billion dollars a year for textbooks and equipment. While both administrators and teachers are eager to see that money released, they're divided over a series of bills that

would give administrators more powers to fire staff, furlough them, or cut their pay. Originally filed in the regular session as HB 400, those "mandate relief" measures have been split up across several smaller bills for the special session. Education Austin co-President **Rae Nwosu** said she was concerned that the district is still pushing for those bills "so they can reduce pay." The district is still under a declaration of financial exigency and could cut pay and conditions easily. However, rather than do more damage to classrooms and employee relations, Nwosu said, "We want to see them put people back to work."

So what about that worse news? Under SB 1, the state would ditch the target revenue system by 2018, terminating its current obligations to fund school districts at the bare minimum of 2006 levels. Even though enrollment is predicted to go up, Williams said, "We're going to continue to deal with declining revenue per student."

A Pay Day From Perry

On May 27, Gov. Rick Perry signed into law a measure that aims to curb theft-of-service crimes involving an employer's failure to pay wages owed to employees. Senate Bill 1024, by Sen. José Rodríguez, D-El Paso, and carried by Austin Dem Rep. Eddie Rodriguez in the House, makes it easier to target employers who fail to provide even partial payment to workers. Nonpayment of wages is a problem in Texas. According to a 2009 report from the Workers Defense Project, 20% of Austin construction workers have reported not being paid for their work, while 50% reported that they were not paid earned overtime wages. The bill closes a legal loophole that allowed employers to skirt enforcement if they'd paid just a portion of wages owed and makes it easier for police to arrest employers who fail to pay wages, according to a press release from the WDP. The WDP worked with lawmakers to get the bill passed; since 2002, the group has helped workers recover more than \$700,000 in wages owed for work. "The Wage Theft Bill is an important victory for Texas workers, especially in this legislative session where workers' rights have been under attack," Rodríguez said. "This new law will ensure that thousands of hardworking Texans receive their fair pay." - Iordan Smith

ONSHORING CORPORATE ACCOUNTS

From **Enron** to **Wall Street**, a big cause of America's major financial collapses in the past decade has been simple deceit. Finaglers used secret offshore accounts and dummy subsidiaries in the Cayman Islands and elsewhere to avoid regulatory scrutiny and to make investors think the businesses were sounder than they really were.

The good news is that **Aetna**, **AIG**, **MetLife**, and other giants have now moved away from such offshore hideouts. The bad news, however, is that they have not actually moved away from the shady practice of hiding their finances from regulators and investors – they just don't have to do it offshore these days. This is because Vermont, Delaware, South Carolina, Utah, and other states have turned themselves into onshore havens for concealing the finances of insurance corporations.

In these states, insurers can set up special subsidiaries that, intriguingly, are called "captives." This scheme allows the same sort of hide-and-seek financial chicanery that offshore havens provided. For example, when AIG was hemorrhaging losses on some of its mortgage insurance policies recently, it created a captive unit in Vermont, shoveled \$7 billion in claims by policy holders into it, and thus – poof! – made AIG's ugly books look handsome, allowing the giant to keep selling more mortgage policies.

Why would states be part of this hustle? Money. In exchange for limp-wristed regulations, they collect taxes and fees from the corporations. But each new state entering this game offers lower taxes to entice captives to locate there, thus compelling all states to shrink their take to stay in the game.

The real captives, as usual, are the consumers, who'll end up bamboozled by the deceit, as well as us taxpayers, who'll be asked to bail out the deceivers. It's a losing game.

FROM REGULATING COMCAST TO JOINING IT

Meredith Baker is hardly a household name, but if you have cable television, her work might soon be entering your household.

That's because she is one of four members of the **Federal Communications**

Commission who voted in January to approve **Comcast**'s takeover of **NBC**. Okaying this takeover means that, for the first time, a giant cable TV provider will now control its own national TV programming network – an anticompetitive concentration of media power that bodes ill both for consumers and democracy.

But Ms. Baker, a Republican and former Bush official, has long been an anti-regulatory corporate ideologue – she even called mergers "consumer-enhancing and job-creating deals," which is the exact opposite of how they really play out. So her vote to let Comcast swallow NBC was no big surprise.

But four months later, a hickey has popped up on Baker's vote. It turns out that she's now leaving the FCC, and guess where she's going. Yes, to the Washington office of the newly merged Comcast-NBC behemoth, where she'll work as a highly paid lobbyist.

The New York Times reports that some are criticizing her spin through the government/corporate revolving door as "ethically questionable." No, it's not. It's ethically corrupt, no question about it! Even though she has to comply with a two-year waiting period before lobbying the FCC itself, she's allowed to start lobbying Congress and the rest of the executive branch immediately.

The head of **Free Press**, a media reform group, calls Baker's lucrative merger with the very corporations she helped merge a blatant example of "a so-called public servant cashing in ... No wonder the public is so nauseated by business as usual in Washington, where the complete capture of government by industry barely raises any eyebrows." Exactly.

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Show Them the Need

The great GOP wave breaks on the realities of the actual cost of government

The Texas Legislature did not return (or rather, did not stay around) for the current special session because (as Gov. Perry would have it) Sen. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, filibustered the school finance bill. In reality, the Lege had to come back (er. never left) because the GOP was beaten by the clock.

In hindsight, it seems ridiculous. With a 19-12 seat majority in the Senate, a 101-49 House supermajority, every significant committee chairmanship under its control, and every statewide office in its pocket, the GOP controlled the pace and face of the session. Nevertheless, those massive majorities - constructed through careful gerrymandering and reckless tea party pandering - have made the Republicans look like dogs chasing a car: Once they caught it, they seemed clueless about what to do with it.

That's not to underestimate how much damage the most arch-conservative wing of the GOP managed this session. With the House Democrats battered by last November's tea party landslide and consequent January defection wave, they were barely able to make a dent in the relentless fulfillment of the conservative agenda. They had to stand by as the GOP carved up the budget to the tea party drumbeat of cut, cut, and cut again, pushing the state of Texas closer than ever to Americans for Tax Reform's Grover Norquist's declared dream of making government "small enough to drown in a bathtub."

Special session or not, the GOP has already garnered its biggest victory. After Gov. Rick Perry sent down his dual diktats of 1) no new taxes and 2) no tapping the Rainy Day Fund to cover future spending, the Lege adopted a budget with slashing cuts in just about every area of government. In that frenzy, however, it failed to change the way the budget distributes that cash. The budget inscribed in House Bill 1 makes the pie radically smaller but cuts it into the same size slices without regard for variations in need - meaning the state could (once again) run out of money before lawmakers return in 2013. The pressure in the special session is to pass the panoply of fixes, patches, reductions, and curlicued accounting tricks that on the whole eluded them in the regular session.

A Broken Process

The seeds of scheduling doom were sown when Perry set his emergency items, a shopping list of conservative red meat: first "sanctuary cities" and eminent domain, then voter ID and a balanced budget amendment (recommendation) to the U.S. Constitution, then abusive and intrusive ultrasound procedures for women seeking abortions. In legislative terms, the "emergency" designation lets lawmakers waive the constitutional restrictions on passing bills in the first 60 days of the session. So for Perry to add the "loser pays" (tort "reform") bill on in May, with less than 30 days remaining, made no sense - other than as political posturing.

As House Appropriations Committee Vice Chair Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, repeatedly told anyone that would listen, the only real emergency matters were the budget, health care, and school finance. However, passing Perry's base-pandering measures consumed the first half of the session, leaving lawmakers little time to work on real issues. When House Public Health Committee Chair Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham, watched HB 5 die on the Senate floor – taking her Interstate Health Care Compact proposal with it - she railed that "the House does the work." The finger pointed the other way at the end of the session, when the school finance reforms in Senate Bill 1811 became a victim of the House calendar. Senate Finance Committee Chair Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, blamed state reps, saying, "It hit late because the House didn't have a viable school plan."

Not that the Republican leadership was above suspending any and all rules to impose its agenda. During the rush to hammer through more tort reform, the normally unshakable Rep. Craig Eiland, D-Galveston, became so disgusted with the skewed process that he threw the House rule book in the air. CONTINUED ON P.32

Worst Session Ever

Budget: Smoke and Mirrors

Not only did the Legislature pass a budget that cuts total spending by \$15.2 billion and general revenue spending by \$1.6 billion, but it also had to use smoke and mirrors to cover its tracks. Here are some of the more egregious accounting tricks.

- \$4.8 billion in acknowledged unfunded health care expenses, leading Austin Rep. Elliott Naishtat to accuse the Republicans of "using Medicaid like a credit card"
- \$125 million increase in school funding that still leaves the state \$4 billion short of covering current costs. That equates to leaving a whole new district the size of Dallas Independent School District unfunded.
- Another \$2.3 billion in "deferred payments" to schools. Basically, the state will hold back its August 2013 payment until September. That means the state will still have to pay it in the next biennium, but that will be the 83rd Legislature's problem.
- \$830 million in federal EduJobs money awarded to Texas in May but held back to the 2011-12 school year to soften the impact of the state cuts
- A \$700 million cut in medical spending that depends on a federal health care waiver. No waiver, no savings.

All this happened while the state was estimated to have \$6.5 billion left in the Rainy Day Fund, much of which will now have to cover that Medicaid shortfall and the deferred school payments in two years' time.

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

The school finance reforms in SB 1811 became the poster child for the time-management disaster. It started off as one of the few good finance bills of the session. Ogden charged Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, with finding some extra cash. It was a onetime deal that mixed selling state assets with some precarious accounting tricks, and it may have been the sole outright admission from Republican leadership that the budget was in fact broken. Nevertheless, instead of helping fix - or at least patch over - the budget hole, it got hijacked in conference committee to become the school finance bill ... then died an unseemly death.

Rep. Scott Hochberg, D-Houston, summed up the situation when SB 1811 finally arrived on the floor: "Nobody in this chamber gave the conference committee the authority" to present this proposal, he told his fellow lawmakers. Normally a conference committee is for hashing out the differences between the House and Senate versions of the same bill, and it only happens after both chambers have voted on their competing versions. Yet neither of the two big school finance reform bills - HB 2721 by House Public Education Chair Rob Eissler, R-The Woodlands, and SB 22 by Senate Public Education Chair Florence Shapiro, R-Plano - ever got a floor debate. Instead, the two committee chairs just walked into the SB 1811 conference room with their own personal plans, closed the door, came out with their own deal, and handed both chambers an ultimatum: Take it or stay for a special. The House blinked and approved it, but the Democratic caucus was not alone in its opposition - tea partiers were surprised to find that a Real ID pilot program (black-hooded harbinger of the New World Order) had been stuck in the bill when no one was looking. As Turner tearfully told the chamber, "This whole process is wrong."

Easier Demagogued Than Done

Divided as the chambers indeed were, their conflicts were nothing compared to the sheer savagery of the political assault on women, minorities, and the needy. Before the session, House Appropriations Committee Chair Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, warned tea party activists that if the state cuts Medicaid "we will have to throw some people out in the street" (see "Medicaid and the Lege: Throw 'Em in the Street?" Dec. 10, 2010). His colleagues either didn't get the message or in the end didn't care: The Lege approved a 17.2% cut in Health and Human Services spending.

It's the same story when it comes to voting rights. Not only did the GOP shove through a hard-line voter ID bill, but then it also added to the project a fearsome redistricting effort that could become a new national low in gerrymandering. Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, has already written to U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder Jr. about minority underrepresentation in the state House maps, and the current congressional proposals seem likely to follow those to the courts.

Expect public school advocates to join them. Throughout the session, the question has been not if but when the state will get sued over education spending cuts and what the suit will look like. The consensus is that public school finance is crippled and that another misguided fix is not enough. In a step that Ogden conceded could mean political suicide, before the session he went so far as to suggest a statewide property tax as the only sensible way to fix the current malfunctioning system. Instead, the Lege decided to tweak the current incomprehensible process and in the bargain create new disparities. The latest "reforms" conjure the specter of the pivotal 1980s Edgewood Independent School District v. Kirby school finance lawsuits, under which poor districts successfully fought the unconstitutionality of inequitable

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
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funding. To resolve that battle took three trips to the courts, and, as Rep. Harold Dutton, D-Houston, told his fellow members, "Today what you're voting for is Edgewood Four."

And in the end, Republicans may come to regret their one big point of pride: the supposedly balanced budget. In 2009, the education budget was backfilled with federal stimulus funds. This year, the numbers are artificially inflated again by the one-time federal "EduJobs" money. Democrats propose using the special session to appropriate part of the \$6 billion in the Rainy Day Fund for schools, but everyone around the Capitol knows that money has been quietly earmarked to pay off the debt the state is bound to accrue over the biennium in Medicaid and Medicare payments (just as the current biennium deficit was resolved with Rainy Day money). Lawmakers are working in the special session to cover that gap by restructuring payments to health care providers, but groups like disability rights advocates ADAPT of Texas have warned that will only drive up the total bill. By slashing in-home care budgets, the state will force more people into far costlier residential facilities. Similarly, cutting preventative care will force more people to depend on county hospitals, turning what is supposed to be the provider of last resort into the only hope for sick Texans.

Yet there remains one bright spark of hope at the bottom of this Pandora's box of policies. Throughout the regular session, firstterm Republican Rep. Lanham Lyne from Wichita Falls was the near-definitional backbencher, introducing a handful of minor bills and following the party line. Yet before he voted for HB 1, the proud conservative told his fellow lawmakers that he was conflicted. He said: "It's easy to say, 'Cut government spending; cut the waste; cut the fat.' Show me where it is." His advice to his fellow freshmen was simple: Teach their constituents about the realities of need and cost in Texas. He warned, "I promise you they don't know what gets spent in our Texas Legislature or how it gets spent."



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

Taking the summer grab for dancers one step further

Each year when Ballet Austin's last performance of the season closes in May, its dancers disperse in search of summer work. They're contracted for just 34 weeks (pretty standard for American ballet companies), so for the rest of the year they cobble together a schedule of guest appearances and teaching gigs, not only for pay but also for keeping in shape, building their résumés, and developing artistically.

So for choreographers who prefer to work with ballet dancers - those technically strong, impeccably trained, full-time professionals who are tied up with relatively wellpaying companies during the performance season - summers are golden. "A lot of choreographers just grab dancers in the summer," explains Ballet Austin dancer Beth Terwilleger, who last year founded Califa Arts Collaborative, a summer project that formalizes that process. Choreographers working with Califa get not only talented and willing dancers but also a performance venue and full production, as well as visibility afforded by the group's ties with Ballet Austin. Califa also encourages choreographers to collaborate with visual artists and musicians, both for audience-sharing and creative expansion.

Currently in only its second year, Califa has built a reputation quickly. Though the project currently can't pay its artists, Terwilleger and her small crew of former and current Ballet Austin dancers have no problem engaging talented, dedicated artists. After last year's venue, the Salvage Vanguard Theater, became standing-room-only, Califa moved this year's performances to the AustinVentures StudioTheater, largely gifted to the group by Ballet Austin. In four free shows, 13 Ballet Austin company members, apprentices, and trainees will perform works choreographed by Jennifer Hart, Michelle Thompson, Reginald Harris, and Lisa del Rosario to live music by Catherine Davis, Wino Vino, and Boff Hoffnar. The pieces will incorporate visual elements by Nadine Latief, Alyson Fox, Cynthia Mooney, Caroline Wright, and Jyl Kutsche.

For her piece, Hart is collaborating with photographer Latief, who will create new photographs of the dancers for onstage projection. "I see the photographs as almost being



another character in the piece," explains
Hart. Latief and Hart intend to tell a separate
story, although each will begin with gestures
Hart created in collaboration with the dancers. The gestures were the product of an
emotionally grueling rehearsal that dancer
Oren Porterfield describes as a "therapy session." Despite the difficulty, Porterfield says

the dancers feel empowered by "being asked to think and be creative" more than is sometimes expected of them during the ballet season. "I feel more comfortable taking risks in rehearsal, because we're trying to create something new" – and that's a new audience as well as a new work.

It's a mutual investment in each other's ideas and the motivation of being an intrinsic part of a group with a purpose that creates devotion to the project, despite the lack of pay. "Because it's sort of informal, there's a sense of ownership," says Porterfield. "You're really helping to create this, investing your time." Likewise, says Hart, the support of dancers is a boost of confidence: "If dancers do commit, it shows that they feel strongly enough about what you're doing." With Califa, Terwilleger seems to have tapped into dancers' desire to engage in collaborative, creative processes and develop artistically in directions that are often difficult to access. And for ballet dancers, it's a matter of collecting as many rewarding experiences as possible before retirement looms around age 40. "A few years ago," Terwilleger says, "I realized that our careers are short, and that I had to go up to people like Jen [Hart] and say: 'I love your work. I want to work with you." Jonelle Seitz

DANA FRIIS-HANSEN

Austin's loss is Grand Rapids' gain

With all the curatorial and administrative talent that he possesses, you wouldn't expect Dana Friis-Hansen to be out of work long – and you'd be right. Not five months after leaving the Austin Museum of Art, where he spent the last nine years as executive director, Friis-Hansen has been snapped

up by Michigan's Grand Rapids Art Museum to serve as its director and chief executive officer.

Without question, this is a huge step up for Friis-Hansen. He arrives as the museum starts its second century – it spent pretty much all of 2010 in grand celebratory mode – but this institution is about the future much more than the past. It's known for the international contemporary art competition ArtPrize, with a \$250,000 award determined by public vote. (Last fall, Austin artist Beili Liu's

installation *Lure/Wave*, *Grand Rapids* was voted third prize and awarded \$50,000.) The museum boasts a new \$75 million, 125,000 square foot home in downtown Grand Rapids designed by Kulapat Yantrasast, Yo-ichiro Hakomori, and Aaron Loewenson of wHY Architecture in Los Angeles. This was the

first art museum in the world to be certified LEED Gold by the Green Building Council and named one of the six best new buildings of 2007 by Newsweek. In the entry pavilion stands the 25-foot-tall wall sculpture Blue White by Ellsworth Kelly, part of a collection that includes more than 5,000 artworks, with

some 300 paintings and sculptures by American and European artists of the last 200 years. Last year, museum attendance topped a quarter-million – a mighty impressive number, especially considering that the population of the greater metropolitan area of Grand Rapids is 1.3 million.

Coincidentally, the museum's previous director also came from Texas. Celeste Adams, who left GRAM in March 2010 after 13 years as director, spent the previous 13 years at the Museum of Fine Arts Houston. Friis-

Hansen's first day on staff will be Wednesday, July 13. That Friday, the museum is hosting a pair of community receptions for locals to welcome the new director, and admission to the museum will be free all day. A welcoming gesture, indeed. Congratulations, Dana!

BLACK ARTS MOVEMENT

Giving comfort and calm with a violin

Samuel Thompson didn't have much with him in the New Orleans Arena when he was stuck there with thousands of other Hurricane Katrina survivors, but he had his violin. And when someone asked him to play it, the classically trained musician responded with the "Adagio" from Johann Sebastian Bach's Sonata No. 1 in G Minor and the "Andante" from the composer's Sonata in A Minor. It was

an incongruous sound in that pit of deep misery but one that was so, so welcome – a balm for the masses who had suffered so much for days and had no idea when their ordeal might end. Thompson played for only a few minutes, but his moving gesture was captured by a photographer for *The Advocate* of Baton Rouge, La., and circulated worldwide, and recounted by a writer for the *Los Angeles*

Times. It brought the South Carolina native a burst of international attention.

The fame generated by that incident isn't why ProArts booked Thompson for its 2011 Black Arts Movement Festival, but the story reveals much about the musician and the man: his devotion to his instrument, his commitment to his craft, and his compassion for his fellow man. It's little wonder, then, that in

the six years since, he has steadily developed a career as a soloist, a chamber musician, and an orchestral leader. This Sunday, June 12, Thompson plays Ebenezer Baptist Church, 1010 E. 10th, with a program including some Bach, naturally (Sonata in A Minor for Unaccompanied Violin); some Brahms and Saint-Saëns (the former's Sonata in D Minor and the latter's Havanaise); and three works

by African-American composer William Grant Still: "Summerland," "Carmela," and "Quit Dat Fool'nish." If the music he makes can cut through the noise and chaos and pain of a sports arena in post-Katrina New Orleans, imagine what it must do in a house of worship.

Thompson's recital is just one of many stellar programs on the Black Arts Movement Festival's

schedule. There's dance with Gesel Mason (June 9) and Dallas Black Dance Theatre with Urban Souls Dance Company (June 11), poetry with the Last Poets and Chandra Washington (June 11), theatre with Ashley Wilkerson (June 14) and Tim'm West (June 16), and comedy with Hazelle Goodman and Ali Siddiq (June 17). The winners of the 2010-2011 Austin Critics Table Awards

On Monday, June 6, the Austin Critics Table handed out its annual awards for outstanding achievements in the Austin arts in a ceremony at Cap City Comedy Club. CELLULOID by Dave McKean Fantagraphics Books, 282 pp., \$35

PAYING FOR IT by Chester Brown Drawn & Quarterly, 288 pp., \$24.95



Two books so ripe with sex, it's as if the subject has fermented in the pages. Two adult-oriented narratives from such different perspectives that you can't resolve the parallax any more than you can whittle a dildo out of fog.

Fermentation and fog: That's the atmosphere in which Dave McKean's graphically charged *Celluloid* breathes and pants and gasps. The longtime illustrator of tales by Neil Gaiman returns to the storyteller side of things, his first lengthy solo opus since 1998's *Cages*, with this extended sexual fantasy published in luxurious hardcover by Fantagraphics. You ever wonder what Lynd Ward would've wrought in full color if he'd been doubly possessed by the god Eros and William Gibson's Wintermute?

Look: A woman goes to the apartment of a male friend who's unable to meet her there; she undresses, takes a bath, turns on the movie projector in the middle of the living room and discovers a portal to elsewhere – an elsewhere that seems a sort of lust-saturated, X-rated version of *Pan's Labyrinth*.


Even if you already know that McKean's figurative drawings are like Egon Schiele limning a new season for Alexander McQueen in heaven, you'll boggle at how mere pen marks on paper can be so arousing. Even if you're familiar with the artist's earlier multimedia work, his juxtapositions and combinations of draftsmanship, painting, photography, collage, and magus-level Photoshoppery here will blow (at least) your mind.

Let's not dally with euphemism: McKean's vivid, wordless dreamscape isn't simply erotic, it's downright pornographic. But with a masterpiece like this, Dictionary.com's going to have to redefine "pornography."

On the other hand, perhaps the ol' explainin' hand, there are plenty of words in Chester Brown's Paying For It, the newest unflinchingly autobiographical comic from the progressive Canadian artist who last brought us the Louis Riel mythos in 2003's Louis Riel: A Comic-Strip Biography. The interiors of this volume comprise Brown's deft, strictly black-and-white minimalist drawings, but the book is published by Drawn & Quarterly with the same exquisite care and style that Fantagraphics lavished on McKean's polychrome tour de force. Of course. How else do you treat such an important work?

This story, this about-as-factual-as-it-gets account, is another sort of tour. It's subtitled "A Comic-Strip Memoir About Being a John," and that's what it is: a chronicle of the years – a little over a decade – in which the artist has habitually used the services of prostitutes. In which the artist has steadfastly – contrary to the arguments posed by his best friends Joe Matt and Seth, among





others – insisted that "prostitution is just a form of dating." And from which chronicle we learn – in a flow of narrative devoid of sensationalism, rendered in a steady eight-panels-per-page rhythm – the details of Brown's ongoing and complex involvement in the world of paid-for coitus.

As in Brown's previous autobiographical works, *The Playboy* and *I Never Liked You*, there's no lack of introspection in this story and, it seems, not much redacted to spare the author embarrassment. You want a john's-eye view of the sex trade, a perspective that reduces mercenary fucking to the almost quotidian? Pull up a chair.

The main story is buttressed with more text-only appendices than you'll find at the end of *The Lord of the Rings*, expansions on Brown's arguments for the normalization of prostitution, rebuttals from his friends, footnotes explicating many of the panels, and a helpful bibliography.

"I can't resist noting," says Seth in his section of notes, "that the idea of Chester Brown and Joe Matt discussing the nature of romantic love is not unlike two blind men painting a sunset." Well, even so: Imagine the potential awesomeness of that image; it's a small part of what's in *Paying For It* in monochromatic but many-perspectived abundance.

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
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Dos Lunas Artisan Cheese

Central Texas has seen an explosion of locally made, artisanal cheeses over the last decade. Mozzarella, cheddar, Monterey Jack, Pepper Jack, cream cheese, *chèvre*, and even aged bleu cheese are readily available from such makers as Full Quiver Farms and Pure Luck. But one simple type of cheese has remained elusive: **fresh ricotta**.

Fresh ricotta is a very different animal from the commercially available, mass-produced variety. At its best, it can be richly creamy, deeply flavorful, and complex, a far cry from the nearly flavorless curds generally available. Finally, outstanding fresh ricotta is being made in Austin by Dos Lunas Artisan Cheese, a company started by **Joaquin Avellan**.

When Avellan traveled to Venezuela to help at home when his father had open-heart surgery, he stayed to help his parents run their cheese-making dairy operation for several months. Later, when he came back home, "In Lunas,' that says. "But make ricot precipitate fresh. But Local chabout Dos

the middle of the night, I would wake up in my bed thinking, 'I have to milk the cows! What is happening in the dairy? I need to make the cheese!'" relates Avellan. "Finally, I realized what it was ... I missed it. I missed making the cheese. So I decided to make my own."

He set out to find raw milk that he felt he could work with. He found it at **Stryk Farms** in Schulenberg. There, the small herd of 60 cows grazes entirely on grass, producing a wonderful, rich milk.

At present, Dos Lunas makes two cheeses: the creamy, complex ricotta (\$5), and a Clasico raw milk cheese (\$6). "Texas law requires that any raw milk cheese be aged for

60 days; that's where we get out name, 'Dos Lunas,' that means two months," Avellan says. "But the ricotta is not a raw cheese. To make ricotta, you first must heat the whey to precipitate out the solids. Our ricotta is super fresh. But the Clasico is aged 60 days."

Local chefs have been wildly enthusiastic about Dos Lunas. At present, Avellan has chefs very interested at La Condesa, wink, Vino Vino, and Vespaio. "Rene Ortiz [at La Condesa] was extremely supportive," says Avellan. "They may buy our Clasico for melting – it is primarily a melting cheese – and our ricotta for desserts. They need so much though, it would mean selling them all the cheese we make. I'm not certain that would be the best move – better to have many customers," he smiles. "Or at least several."

At the Dos Lunas stand at the Sunset Valley Farmers' Market, assisted by his daughter Elise and nephew Xavier, Avellan also sells his cheeses in hot quesadillas with a variety of fillings (\$4) as well as chilled to take home.

Blanco Valley Farms Tortilla Chips

Jim and Marla Sanders of **Blanco Valley Farms** have been making powdered chili and dip mixes since the early Nineties. All of their delicious spice mixes contain no salt, no MSG, and no artificial flavors of any kind. Initially, they sold their products from their house in Blanco before moving on to farmers' markets and gift shops throughout the Hill Country.

When the Austin farmers' market scene exploded in popularity, their son **Tracy Sanders**, who lives and works in Austin, began selling his parents' line of mixes at the markets here. Of course, to try a dip you need to have some sort of chip, so Tracy brought tortilla chips that he had fried up himself.

"Before the first day was out, I had people begging me to sell them my chips!" Sanders relates. "So I asked if I could sell them too, along with my parents' mixes and salsas. The answer was yes, as long as I used organic masa and fried them in high-quality coconut oil."

Thus a fantastic product was born. Sanders' tortilla chips are so outstanding, you simply can't find chips of similar quality at any store. They must be tried to be believed. Crisp and thick, they're light in spite of their sturdiness and have no oily aftertaste. Sanders starts with organic white-corn masa from New Mexico. "White corn has a different texture than yellow corn," he explains. "It is more flourlike and softer. It makes tortillas that fold more easily without breaking."

Every Friday, he heats up a fryer full of virgin coconut oil, and while it heats he starts making his tortillas with a commercial tortilla machine. "I make between 100 and 150 pounds of organic corn tortillas every week," he says. "And my tortillas are completely gluten-free. I have been told that some tortilla chips manufacturers lightly dust their chips with wheat flour to keep them from sticking together on the conveyer belts after frying. But nothing touches my chips except a very light dusting of sea salt."



Despite their premier quality, the prices for Sanders' tortillas and chips are comparable to national brands. An 8-ounce bag is \$3, and a 1½ pound bag is \$7. "My bags look smaller because they aren't full of air; the big manufacturers have to seal up a lot of air inside the bags to prevent breakage in shipping," Sanders explains. "I sell the tortillas too: fresh white corn, whole wheat, and flour tortillas [\$2 for a bag of six]. But 80 percent of my tortillas get made into chips. That's just what people like." - K.T.

Tracy Sanders sells his tortillas, chips, and salsas at the Barton Creek Farmers Market from 9am to 1pm on Saturdays.

The 2011 International Association of **Culinary Professionals** conference ended Saturday evening with a delicious Foodways Texas barbecue benefit on the grounds of Boggy Creek Farm. By all reports, the conference was a huge hit with attendees, who enjoyed the fabulous opening reception at the Bob Bullock Texas State History Museum and the cookbook awards ceremony at the historic Paramount Theatre in addition to four action-packed days and nights of culinary tours, informative seminars, local restaurant meals, and parties. Kudos to Austin conference Chair Toni Tipton-Martin and her entire planning committee for dazzling our guests with some of the best of our local food and drinks, distinctive area venues, and topflight culinary talent - congratulations on a job well done! One of the most popular public events during the conference was the inaugural Edible Texas Wine Food Match competition final held at the AT&T Executive Education and Conference Center, Austin chef David Garrido emerged victorious, garnering \$5,000 and winning both the judges' and people's choice voting with a three-course menu paired with wines from Fall Creek and Sister Creek vineyards (see the winning menu at www.edibleaustin.com/ediblewandf). The event also raised \$10,000 for the new nonprofit Center for Wine & Culinary Arts in Fredericksburg.

Monument Market (500 S. Austin Ave., Georgetown) is the new organic food store from Monument Cafe owner Rusty Winkstern. The venerable member-owned store has been an ardent supporter of local products for years, and I apologize for the omission in last week's feature, "Fertile Ground for Foodies."

Thai Fresh is expanding again, this time taking over the Cafe Caffeine space directly adjacent to the popular Thai delicatessen. An open archway already connects Thai Fresh with the coffeehouse, which has stayed operational throughout the transition, continuing to serve espresso drinks, baked goods, sandwiches, beer, and wine.

But already there have been subtle changes: Jam Sanichat, the sunny owner and chef of Thai Fresh, has brought in Casa Brasil coffee beans, a directly traded coffee roasted locally in Austin. The bakery case is full of vegan and gluten-free baked goods as well as conventional ones, and the sandwiches are trending Thai. "The bestsellers, by far, are the Thai sandwiches," says Sanichat, "satay

chicken with peanut sauce and pulled pork with spicy cabbage" (\$6.50 and \$4.99). "With our vegan ice creams and pastries, we get a lot of vegans in here, so I have a mashed chickpea with lemon tahini sandwich [\$4.99] for them, too." Several mainstream sandwiches are served as well, such as egg salad and tuna salad (\$4.99 each).

Breakfast tacos are another addition. These too incorporate Thai flavors; the most popular is the Thai omelet taco (\$2.75) that Sanichat also serves at the Downtown Farmers' Market. Other varieties include curried potatoes and egg (\$2.75); sausage, egg, and potato (\$3.25); and black bean and potato (\$2.75). Sanichat is dedicated to local sourcing: All the breakfast tacos are made with locally produced pastured eggs, and the meats come directly from nearby farms.

The Cafe Caffeine sign is still up, but when I ask her if she's going to change the name, Sanichat's face completely lights up: "Oh yes! The new name is going to be Thrice." I immediately jump to the conclusion that the name refers to the tripling of the Thai Fresh footprint. "Oh no," she says, "Let me tell you. The name was totally inspired by Conan O'Brien!

"You see, I was watching Conan, and he had this bit where he was saying, 'Why are we inventing new words all the time, like "frenemy" and "vlog," when there are per-

fectly good words just languishing in the dictionary, like "thrice"?' So the next day, I felt sorry for 'thrice' and used it as much as I could. Talking to the staff, I am saying, 'I have told you thrice already!' and 'I have already looked there thrice,' and everyone was laughing and having fun with it

all day. And it occurred to me, this is the third time I have tried to expand into the coffee shop, and this time, when I tried for the third time, I was able to get it. So Thrice will be the name! Once I get the new sign up, I am going to take a picture and send it to Conan and thank him for the inspiration. What do you think? Maybe I'll get on national TV!"

Besides the subtle changes that have already taken place, much bolder changes will be happening over the summer. To begin with, Thrice will start serving brunch in time for Father's Day (June 19), with food made to order by a



hot line. In addition to the breakfast tacos and sandwiches, Thrice will be serving Thai fried rice with fried egg, Thai tea French toast, breakfast pizza with fried egg, and Thai rice soup.

Sanichat also plans to have live music for a few of the brunch hours, with jazz singer Laura Graft. "I'm also thinking about maybe having some bluegrass music," she says, "Maybe outside, after it cools off in the fall."

Brunch will also feature mimosas and sangria in addition to the dozen wines by the glass that are now served, and the beers on tap (512 IPA, Live Oak pilsner, and Lone Star) will see a few more additions.

But all this pales in comparison to the biggest change of all: Thai Fresh is going to change from a delicatessen-style establishment, where already-prepared food is served from a cold case, to a regular, food-made-to-order restaurant. "I know it's going to upset some of our

clientele who stop by to get a three-item plate on the way home. But the public has been adamant: People want things made to order, and now we will have enough space to do it," Sanichat says. There will be a short closure for remodeling, probably around the Fourth of July, but when Thai Fresh reopens, it will be as a restaurant that has a menu that you order from, rather than a deli case.

"I still want to be able to change what we are offering with the seasons, so we will definitely have specials, lots of specials!" Sanichat laughs. "It's going to be hard to let the deli case go, but already I am excited about all the things we are going to be able to do. I'll be able to serve appetizers, like my spicy corn fritters, and desserts like warm sticky rice topped with mango-lime ice cream. And fresh noodles! It's going to be great."

Buda Grocery & Grill

Buda Grocery & Grill opened in 1913 as the E. J. Cleveland General Store, on the corner of Main and Peach streets in downtown Buda, and it still has the original pressed-tin ceiling and hardwood floors. It went through several sets of owners in the intervening vears, until Madelyn and Rusty Uresti purchased it two years ago. The store has made burgers until 3pm for the last seven years, but the Urestis came up with new extended hours, a new menu, and a new seasoning mix for the meat, and the public has taken notice ... quietly. "We've never advertised the burgers - just relied on word of mouth," says night manager Mike Davis. "That's the best advertising you can get."

I heard about the burgers from a friend who lives in the area. The first one I had really reminded me of the burgers of days past, perfectly fitting the history of the building. When I got through, there was juice running halfway down both arms and a small pool in the bottom of the basket. I had to jury-rig some



folded napkins to tilt the fries-end of my basket to isolate the juice. This is definitely not a burger for long sleeves, and a bib wouldn't be overkill. My favorite is the double cheeseburger with bacon (\$5.29). The buns (white or wheat) are toasted on both sides on the griddle, which gives them the strength to contain


the massive girth of what's in the middle. Two well-seasoned, hefty patties are both covered with thick slices of smoky bacon and cheese, and the vegetables are all crisp and fresh. You want your onions grilled? You need only ask. Then you have to smash everything down to be able to take the first bite. This, my friends. is a hamburger of note, and the Blue Bell vanilla shake (\$2.49) was as good as it gets.

But burgers are not all that's here. Back in the day, Angie Garcia's breakfast tacos were legendary. Garcia is no longer there, but the tacos remain (\$1.39-1.89). One of the favorites is Walter's Special (\$2.49), with rich carne guisada, grilled jalapeños and onions, and tomatoes. The ultimate might be the Kicker (\$2.49), with chorizo, egg, potato, sausage, beans, cheese, jalapeños, and bacon bits. It has a full breakfast menu, including migas, huevos rancheros and mexicanos, omelets, pancakes, biscuits, and the delightful "oatmeal and fixin's" (\$2.99), loaded with raisins, dried cranberries, shaved almonds, butter, and brown sugar.

Daily lunch specials (\$5.99) run all week. We had some wonderful lasagna on a Monday, and Tuesday's special is Minnie's Enchiladas. Minnie is Rusty's mom, and a cook of such

note that the Valero Texas Open golf tournament in San Antonio (where they know good Mexican food) asked her to start catering the closing party every year. They had no choice, as pro golfer Nick Watney is Madelyn and Rusty's son-in-law, and Minnie's legendary aftertournament parties were so good that few golfers would go to the official party. To round out the week, Wednesday's special is meat loaf, Thursday's is chicken-fried steak, and Friday's is barbecue brisket.


The Urestis hope to have their liquor permit by mid-July and will start serving cocktails. They will also start serving steaks, pasta, fish, and other items on the back patio soon after. Every first Saturday is classic car day, when local gearheads show off their rides at the restaurant. First Thursdays in Buda, there's a wine tasting in the evening, and then you can head down to the flower shop for a catered dinner (\$8.99). On Saturdays, Miss Ruthie, an elderly African-American local, is out front selling amazing baked goods (that \$10 chess pie was fantastic). For a return to the amazing burgers of the past and great food in the present, Buda Grocery & Grill needs to be on your foodie radar. It is superb - and only getting better. - Mick Vann

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The Professor and the Aliens

Noah Wyle may not have that elusive quality known as "star power," but he's dependable. As Dr. John Carter, the longestrunning character on ER, Wyle showed how he could shape and develop a character, bringing it to life from a few words of wellwritten text. But when he began starring in those pleasant but ultimately unmemorable Librarian films on TNT (you know, the ones with hokey subtitles like Quest for the Spear and The Curse of the Judas Chalice), it was clear that he did not have the star power to make a weak piece seem better than it really was.

Some actors are simply better suited to series TV, and Wyle might be one of them. That's why, after those blah Librarian films, I was pleasantly startled by his star turn in the new TNT series Falling Skies. Executive produced by Steven Spielberg and Graham Yost (Justified) and created by Robert Rodat (who wrote the pilot from an idea he coconceived with Spielberg), Falling Skies has a strong pedigree. Even so, the final product, while visually impressive in the beginning, wears a bit thin storywise in later episodes. But it's Wyle's measured performance that keeps you watching, even as he recites exposition in the most ham-handed way possible. Or is it his character who's ham-handed? Honestly, it's hard to

tell. That's a compliment. Wyle plays Tom Mason, a professor of military history who is trying to keep his family alive after an apocalyptic alien invasion. In voiceover, children recount the invasion at the beginning of the series, with one missing detail: why the aliens have invaded. The

only thing anyone knows is that the aliens huge, sticky-looking creatures that are a cross between a spider and an undersea reptile - seek human children and youth for some mysterious need.

Mason's wife was killed during the invasion, leaving him to care for his eldest son, Hal (Drew Roy), and youngest son, Matt (Maxim Knight). Middle son Ben (Connor Jessup) is believed dead - until Hal thinks he's spotted him while on reconnaissance. Mason and Hal decide to rescue Ben, and this is what propels the series forward. However, because they are members of a group of resistance fighters called the Second Massachusetts, they are compelled to put their personal needs behind those of their militia. Not easy, especially for the impulsive Hal.

And this is where the ham-handedness comes in. When the group is weary or when emotions flare, Mason offers snippets of



U.S. Revolutionary War history and other famous battles in world history to remind everyone to keep their eyes on the prize. It's an interesting juxtaposition, aided by the fact that the alien invaders are not presented as technologically or intellectu-

ally superior to humans (they're just bigger and uglier). But the manner in which Mason offers his history lessons is as engaging as someone reading aloud from a poorly written history textbook. With all the creative capital of the series creators, there isn't a more inspired way

to do the same thing? Actually, that opportunity is lost in the character of John Pope (Colin Cunningham). An ex-con and the leader of a gang living outside the resistance, John is also a student of history. His swagger and nihilism put him at odds with Mason and the resistance, but when he waxes historical, you can't help but enjoy every ornery word. His scenes are energized and often very funny.

I've only seen the first six of the eight episodes, but it's clear that the revelation of what drives the alien invaders is supposed to be stunning. Let's hope. Because even with Wyle's reliable performance leading the way, it will be annoying if the reveal doesn't match the big tease.

Moon Bloodgood (Terminator Salvation) and Will Patton (Armageddon) also costar. Falling Skies has its two-hour premiere Sunday, June 19, at 8pm on TNT.

THIS TANGLED WEB HE WEAVES

Small-screen experimentalist Max Juren goes big with his debut feature, 'The Third Person'

There are two trailers for Max Juren's The Third Person on YouTube, and they are both self-deprecating in different ways. One has little more than slow-motion shots of people falling and flying accompanied by Eighties synth ditties while the voiceover of God heckles, saying things like, "Boring" and "This is so slow." The other trailer is edited and soundtracked like a Lord of the Rings installment except with Frodo replaced by snippets of tea bagging (in tea), rhythmic gymnastics, and a flying dog. The two takes on the same film make it hard to estimate how the direc-

tor and star's first feature will ultimately look. Should viewers put on their snooty specs to prepare themselves for non sequiturs and outré imagery layered with meaning? Or maybe people should slip into their viral video undies and get ready for 80 minutes of

Rickrollin' and Web-ready freakiness. The reality is in between ... or perhaps both at the same time.

The film's identity crisis began early in production. "At first I thought this was going to be groundbreaking, and I'd be breaking all of these cinematic rules," admits Juren, "and as I moved along, it turned out to be a pretty straightforward narrative." Juren remembers co-star and co-writer Michelle Devereux observing early on that the movie had a lot in common with "dudes just livin' their lives in

a crazy world" films like Ferris Bueller's Day Off and Weekend at Bernie's. Devereux plays the love interest and helps clarify her role in the writing process thusly: "He has all of these short vignettes that don't really make any sense," she laughs. "I felt like I helped him work it into a narrative plot." Juren concurs. "I couldn't have written a narrative that long without help, and Michelle was a huge part of that,"

That plot involves Juren's character going so deep into the modern voyeuristic wormhole of online videos that he comes to see

> his own life as a movie that he is both watching and directing. That skewed viewpoint leads to action sequences, Bollywood dances, and even a romantic arc. There are more than a few wrenches thrown into the plot from

left field, lending The Third Person a feeling of accelerating unpredictability. Add to that sense of a life out of control some dated visual effects, and you've got a finished product that Juren describes as being "rampantly unconcerned with fidelity."

That lack of concern likely comes from his experiences in the realm of YouTube, making short videos that owe as much to experimental cinema as they do to clichéd tropes of the viral variety (see "Crowded Canvas," April 10, 2009). That quick and

dirty filming and producing process of getting videos online became a thing of the past as Juren embarked on a three-year production put together with sweat and spit. "If I could have shot it in three weeks straight, I would have loved to have done that," says Juren. "It's a lot to think about for me: getting locations and doing it all yourself and doing it for virtually free." But as the intermittent shooting schedule (or lack thereof) finally came to a close, it was time to think about showing the movie to

It's fitting that a movie done on the fly and on the cheap should bring the darkened halls of the Dobie Theatre back to life, if only for one night. How exactly did Juren score the Egyptian Room for this feature debut? He asked. Juren explains the process more completely, "I called up the manager, and he was OK with it." End of story. The necessity of providing a projector and sound equipment is a hoop Juren is willing to jump through for the legendary space.


Discussing his own inability to incorporate all of the cinematic themes he started with, Juren says: "As you start to edit, you think, 'That motif doesn't fit.' I have to just make it not boring if at all possible." The Third Person is anything but boring. Despite the hiccups in production and harsh lessons in the editing room, Juren has the heart of a dedicated filmmaker. Selfdeprecation is replaced with confidence when Juren discusses the meaning of his movie. He can discuss themes of "autovoyeuristic egotism" and the "aping of mass-media culture" without hesitation. And it was the hope of communicating these ideas to an audience that motivated Juren. "It was the strength and relevance of these concepts that kept my heart and intellect committed to the project for so long," says Juren, before returning to his usual humility, "... even if the execution was less than exemplary."

Nerd Ascending

Simon Pegg's star trajectory

Entertainingly alternating, as it does, between being a trenchant memoir on the sometimes comic (and often not) vicissitudes of growing up in the UK in the Eighties and Nineties and being a Courier-font meta-sci-fi tale of "Pegg" and his robosexual manservant Canterbury, Simon Pegg's Nerd Do Well: A Small Boy's Journey To Becoming a Big Kid is clearly not your average autobiography. Oh, sure, it recounts the ongoing trek to comic superstardom (or a reasonable facsimile thereof) of one of the creative forces behind and in front of Spaced, Shaun of the Dead, Hot Fuzz, and, most recently, Paul. But it's more interesting - and possibly more British-y when compared with most Yank celeb nob-yankers – by dint of how smart a read it is.

Overflowing with alarmingly bang-on analyses of geek/nerd iconography from the Enterprise to the Death Star to Comic-Con, the Pegg's Tale, so to speak, is the kind of personal history you wish all your four-color heroes would write but generally don't. Also, reading it on public transportation leaves you wide open to unforeseeable guffaws that, in

turn, leave you looking completely mental. On public transportation. Be forewarned.

The Austin Chronicle spoke to Pegg on the eve of his stateside book tour, which touches down at BookPeople on June 15, and uncovered, among other choice items, his early fear of horror films and why any film (but one) with a title like _____ Movie is shite and to be avoided. At a time when fellow comic Patton Oswalt has declared geekdom dead due to hellacious pop-cultural overexposure, Pegg is still intensely game to go where no nerd has gone before. Read it and weep; read it and rejoice; just whatever you do, don't "skip to the end."

Austin Chronicle: Did vou read Patton Oswalt's 2010 Wired essay, "Wake Up, Geek Culture. Time To Die"?

Simon Pegg: I did, yeah.

AC: And ...?

SP: I think he's kind of got a point. Basically, what's happened is that what used to be a sort of niche part of culture has now become the mainstream. It's been hegemonized, if I can use that word, by the mainstream and diluted to an extent as well. I think it all boils down to infantilism, people wanting to stay in a state of regressive childhood and that mentality. And that's the reason why the vast majority of cinematic output is superheroes and spaceships and stuff like that. It's all children's stuff, and that's because none of us want to grow up, you know? The world grows up and realizes that if it's just us, as far as we know, in this giant universe, then we need to be comforted, and so we look to childish things. It's become so much that way that everyone's into it now. As for us [older geeks/nerds], it's become as if they were fans of a band that has started to become suddenly very famous. Geeks, real geeks, are pissed off because, you know, now everybody's in on the game.

AC: Geekdom is no longer the purview of those social misfits and/or brilliant forward-thinkers with enough free time and due diligence to wait out and track down Tom Baker-era Doctor Who episodes on their local PBS affiliate or original copies of EC Comics. That sort of "diggers" effort is no longer required to establish geek cred.

SP: Yeah, and I think that Comic-Con is a great example of how geek culture has been hijacked, basically, by corporate thinking. Comic-Con used to be exactly that: a small comic convention in San Diego. Now it's a massive film festival, and even the films that have a presence there aren't necessarily even related to the spirit of the event, you know? It's not just science fiction, fantasy, or comic book adaptations. Now you've also got comedies and just a lot of stuff that's just, I don't know, not what Comic-Con used to be all about. I remember seeing Pineapple Express and Hamlet 2 there, films which might, perhaps,

have some crossover appeal for people of a certain age but certainly aren't anything to do with comic book culture as a whole.

Interestingly, Star Wars initially had a presence at Comic-Con. Lucas was one of the first filmmakers to actually use Comic-Con as a way of generating a ground buzz on the film as a sciencefiction film, which was very cunning, considering what Star Wars has become and what Comic-Con has become. I still love Comic-Con, and that's not a criticism of

Comic-Con. That's just my own issue. Maybe. AC: In Nerd Do Well, quoting from one of your university papers titled "Base and Supersucker: A Marxist Overview of Consent in Star Wars and Related Works," you make a very cogent argument on the possibly negative effects of pop culture on "the masses." You're a father now, so what can Tony Stark and Reed Richards teach young people beyond the joys of kicking ass, saving the world, and enjoying awesome superpowers?

SP: Good question. I think that's something be about watching a firework display. Instead of it just being passive entertainment, you should actually have some work to do. The trouble is that that's not an attractive proposition for people, to have to go and do some work while they're at the theatre. You have to kind of disguise it.

I think that education has to be the root of all our successes and failures. Children have to be turned into functioning, good, smart adults. The world would be a better place if we all were a lot cleverer, and we're not particularly going in that direction. It is kind of worrying, because as entertainment has become more corporate, more widespread, with more television networks and more film companies, everyone's vying for the dollar. It's like everyone is tending to pander toward our unleashed popular culture. It's just the path of least resistance. It's like those people who go see those films that are called (Something) Movie? You know, those dreadfully unfunny pieces of shit?

AC: Like Scary Movie.

SP: Right. The fact that those movies make money just goes to show how undemanding we've become as a cinemagoing audience. It kind of frightens me. A lot.

AC: Probably the only exception to that would be Mel Brooks' Silent Movie.

SP: Silent Movie is a fantastic film. And Mel Brooks is a really interesting example of a guy who did spoof films, and his best work are spoofs of the films that he loved. He loved Westerns; he loved Universal horror films; he loved Hitchcock movies. High Anxiety and Young Frankenstein are two of the best comedy films ever made. When he did something he didn't like – like Star Wars – it was terrible.


AC: You'll probably go to your grave and come back from it being best associated with Shaun of

the Dead, but in Nerd Do Well, you cop to the fact that you didn't even see a zombie film, Romero's Day of the Dead, until 1985, and actually saw Tom Savini's 1990 remake of Night of the Living Dead before you saw Romero's original.

SP: I will admit to having a slight fear of horror in the early Eighties, right before my teens, because it was the age of VHS and, initially, there were no sort of laws of censorship when it came to the UK. All the video shops were just filled with these

sort of unrated, dodgy horror films that looked completely terrifying on the boxes if you were a 12-year-old boy. When I was 11, my friend got a copy of The Texas Chainsaw Massacre. and I didn't watch it because I was frightened that it would make me mental. And then one day my friend [rented] An American Werewolf in London, and I girded my loins and watched it. And I absolutely loved it, because, yes, it was kind of frightening, but it was also funny and smart and brilliant. It showed me that I could watch a film that had extreme violence and not only would I not be mentally disturbed by it; I would be mentally inspired by it. That was a defining moment for me. Obviously.

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

The Chemistry of Life

Chaos in Tejas is actually a misnomer for Timmy Hefner's annual summer punk parade. Certainly there was no shortage of mayhem during the four-day carousal last weekend, yet the whole crazy affair ran on schedule and without any reported injuries despite countless circle pits kicking up more collective dust than the 2005 Austin City Limits Music Festival. Before reuniting with his NYC outfit Citizens Arrest, Ted Leo launched a solo suite at Beerland on Thursday that transitioned from Hüsker Dü's "Could You Be the One?" into the Misfits' "Angelfuck." The following night Syrian wedding singer Omar Souleyman left Antone's in a dizzving trance of Middle Eastern house music concocted by his one-man band of gypsies, Rizan Sa'id, who balanced fluttering high-octave arpeggios across two keyboards and a drum pad. Other highlights included the stoner guitar triumph of Milk Music from Olympia, Wash., at **End of an Ear** Saturday, followed by the annual return of Denton's the Marked Men at Beerland. Then came the walking contradiction that is **Fucked Up**, a hardcore band with epic zeal, as witnessed by the biblical thrust of latest David Comes to Life. Frontman **Damian Abraham** orchestrated Mohawk's pit on Sunday like a hairy pinball wizard, delivering at least one Tombstone pile driver in between "I Hate Summer" and "Triumph of Life," two songs that make a fitting epitaph to the finest Chaos in Tejas yet. The Payback

Orville Bateman Neeley III originally envisioned his namesake punk revue as a soul band. "But that'd feel kinda trite these days," spouts the 25-year-old Denton transplant in between sets at Beerland on Saturday afternoon, where he's worked the soundboard since 2009. "There's just a lot of boring bands in town. I didn't want to be like them." OBN III's proved the polar opposite at Red 7 on Thursday for Chaos in Tejas, shimmying through feral proto-punk gems as the quintet's dual guitar attack stoked Neeley testifying like a Southern Pentecostal preacher with the shake appeal of Iggy Pop and a Pete Townshend complex. He records full-band demos by play-

ing every instrument himself, fitting given his prolific work as a local producer (for the **Strange Boys** and **John Wesley Coleman III**) and drummer for contemporaries **A Giant Dog**, not to mention his mainstay gig as guitarist/singer for Denton power-pop trio **Bad Sports**. Between those three projects, there are about six new records in the works. "I want to make people laugh but at the same time kind of make them uncomfortable," summarizes Neeley. For a sampling, swing by the weekend stand by UK punks the **Paul Collins Beat** at **Spider House Ballroom**, featuring Bad Sports and **Flesh Lights** on Saturday, followed OBN III's and A Giant Dog on Sunday.

Two of a Kind

In early 2007, **Rosie Flores** produced what should've been **Janis Martin**'s comeback album, her first major studio recordings in 30 years. The self-proclaimed "Female Elvis" was diagnosed with cancer following the sessions and passed that September. After pitching labels, Flores has opened a Kickstarter campaign to help master and release the album (**www.kck.st/14Y2P3**). "I hope to inspire more young females to rock like her in the way that Janis inspired me through the years," wrote Flores (see "Gypsy Rose," Aug. 10, 2007), who first worked with Martin on two duets for her 1995 album, *Rockabilly Filly*. Flores visits the **Cactus Cafe** on Saturday, June 11. On a similar note, OTR's pleased to report that after reading here about **Joel Laviolette**'s campaign to help build a full marimba set for the **Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired**, the **Texas Music Office** awarded the **Rattletree Marimba** leader with a \$1,500 grant.

Beautiful World

Imagine if **Devo** wrote ditties about "Mrs. Hermit Crab" and "Itchy Scratchy." That's essentially **Mr. Leebot**, the alter ego of former **Manager's Choice** guitarist **Lee Davila**. "It's fun to play for kids because they're very honest and you get immediate reactions," he says. There's an irony to Davila's current situation, though: He's a children's entertainer with no kids of his own. For the past two years, he and his wife have been in the process of adopting two Ethiopian babies, and the proceeds from his third electro-pop album, *Erratic Schematic*, are being used to purchase a space heater, refrigerator, and stove, along with medical supplies for the kids' orphanage. The two have already raised more than \$3,000 and will be making the trip sometime in the next few weeks. "They're beautiful kids there, and they're well cared for considering," Davila notes, "but there are certain things that they really need." Donate at **www.ourbabybots.blogspot.com.**

- The latest installment of the **Alamo Drafthouse**'s Music Monday series, 2009's Wheedle's Groove, documents the unearthing and revival of Seattle's once-thriving soul scene in the late 1960s. **Black Angels** frontman **Alex Maas** is credited with additional camerawork thanks to his sister, **Jennifer**, who directed the film, which screens June 13 at the **Ritz**. "The story is beautiful in many ways," attests Maas.
- Leroy Franklin, who cut what's considered to be Texas' first rap record, 1981's "Star Bird II," passed away in Austin on May 30. He was 58. "Leroy was a super sweet guy and a seriously talented musician," professes **Noel Waggener** of **Heavy Light Records**, which re-pressed the single in 2009.
- Local songwriter **David Moss** and St. Edward's graduate **Grace Pettis** were among the winners of the **2011 New Folk Competition**. It's a poetic, full circle moment for Pettis, whose father, **Pierce**, won the same honor the year she was born, 1987, and later penned songs for **Art Garfunkle** and **Joan Baez**. The 35th anniversary edition of the **Kerrville Folk Festival** wraps up this weekend, with the annual **Underground Kerrville Revue** rolling into the Cactus Cafe on Tuesday, June 14.
- Pushing the boundaries of the current live-stream concert trend, **Stageside Productions** is hosting a pay-per-view streaming of **Widespread Panic**'s two-night stand at **ACL Live at the Moody Theater**, June 14-15, through Facebook. Guitarist **John Bell** will also take part in a virtual Q&A preshow. Single streams run \$5, with unlimited access bumped to \$10, which is still cheaper than a couple of beers or Downtown parking.

Family Affair

The importance of being Akina Adderley

Adderley: Jazz counts it among its essential names, stamped on Miles Davis' *Kind of Blue* for starters. On this particular night, it's affixed in big, black letters on the Belmont's bright white marquee: Akina Adderley.

Grandfather Nathaniel "Nat" Adderley, a cornetist, began playing with Ray Charles among myriad others, alongside his saxophonist brother Julian "Cannonball" Adderley, who was later recruited by Davis. Akina's father is pianist Nat Adderley Jr.; her mother, singer-actress Janet Adderley. The Adderley train from Florida, where her grandfather was born, makes major stops in New York, New Jersey, Houston, and California before returning to Texas. It's a journey singer Akina Adderley travels with some baggage and much confidence.

Carrying a family name is an untold trial that requires skill, intelligence, ingenuity, and, oh yes, talent. It requires the understanding that a career in music today isn't just about a 45-minute set and a 15-minute break. A life in music today calls not for less art but for more multitasking.

A vocalist must be not only the voice but also the instrument. It's not enough to sing well; there's also writing and playing. In addition, a vocalist usually assumes the role of booking agent, road manager, publicist, and producer, manager, merchandiser, accountant, and – as often in the case with the band – parent and/or referee. That's not counting any day job that has to be worked or personal relationships such as with a spouse, a significant other, or much less children. And it helps to be facile with the press.

Lucky Akina Adderley was born into a legacy that gifted her at birth with these abilities. She and her Vintage Playboys step right into the time-honored role of entertaining a crowd that, while appreciative, thinks of her as little more than background sound. Little do they realize: They're being schooled.

Something About That Brass

In the 1950s, jazz enjoyed a decade of growth, exploration, and popularity unprecedented in decades since. Big band, hot jazz, Dixieland, Western swing, R&B – all had their way with the genre before that, but in the Fifties something else was happening, something marked by new sounds and directions. If the era's synonymous with the Cold War and brittle black-and-white television, that rigid atmosphere made the evolution of jazz possible and that of rock & roll imminent.

The Adderleys brought an exuberance to jazz. Cannonball re-formed his breakout band, the Cannonball Adderley Quintet (featuring Nat Adderley), in 1959 after his stint with Davis. Within the brothers' hard-bop style fermented elements of funk and soul that Cannonball didn't live to see applied to contemporary musical developments such as hip-hop. Akina's grandfather Nat, who died in 2000, witnessed all of it.

Akina, born in 1979, never met her granduncle Cannonball, who died in 1975 at age 46, but she kept a very close relationship with her grandfather, who died when she was a junior in college. The Adderley brothers grew up in Florida during a time when convicts labored paving streets. Young Nat listened closely to the cadence of their call-and-response, the seeds of which became his signature tune, "Work Song."

"I saw him several times a year," recalls his granddaughter. "My sister and I went on tour with him to Europe when I was 10. I still have a lot of fondness for trumpet players and cornet players. I often wonder if my playing music where horns are such an integral part is because I listened to soul stuff when I was a kid or because my grandfather played trumpet.

"There's something about that brass. It's its own voice, and it supports and complements the human voice."

Akina wasn't the first Adderley to catch the blazing family torch; she's just the most active of her generation. "Because apparently I only go to schools where my parents went," she jokes, noting that she attended what's now New York's LaGuardia High School for Music & Art and Performing Arts and, later, Yale University. Always a strong vocalist, she studied opera and classical music.

Her father, Nat Adderley Jr., once held the Adderley standard too, fulfilling his musical promise early with piano and composition. At 11, he wrote "I'm on My Way," recorded in 1967 when he was 13 by his father and uncle. Nat Jr. had the good fortune to attend LaGuardia High School, where he met Luther Vandross. The two formed a friendship that resulted in Nat Jr. leading the soul singer's band for 25 years. Vandross died in 2005.

"They were in a [school] group together called Listen My Brother, and they performed a couple times on early *Sesame Street*," marvels Akina. "Luther was an amazing man, a sweetheart, an incredible performer, and an avid lover of *Ms. Pac-Man*! He used to bring a big video-game console on tour.

"Luther dragged me up onstage one time during a song called 'Searching,' where they brought on a few cafe tables and had the backup singers sit at the tables, legs crossed, two-hand snapping. I was in the pit with the musicians, and he had one of the backup singers run down, grab me, and drag me up.

"What could I do? Had to sing me some 'Searchin'! Searchin'! and snap to that beat!"



The Belmont Stakes

As her Vintage Playboys filter onstage, Akina Adderley cuts a lithe figure in a summery yellow dress, setting up her microphone and dashing to a nearby table to finish her dinner between setup chores. Her husband, Todd Jenkins, sets up his percussion instruments beside drummer Ed Miles as Eric Lange and Jace Ryann tune guitars and Kyle Clayton plugs in a bass. Keyboardist Nick Litterski is absent tonight, as are the Smokestack Horns or the Hellfire Horns. Tonight a sole trumpet suffices.

As with many Sixth Street area bars and restaurants, playing the Belmont appears to be an easy gig: serenade a post-work and night-

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club crowd with rock, pop, and jazz standards. Nothing too obscure or buzzkill will be played, unlike her gigs at Antone's or Momo's, for example, where a different audience is listening with an ear for originality.

"At the Belmont, the audience might not necessarily be coming to see me, so I try to balance the set. It's more

original material, actually, but I do like to include a good number of covers. We play Steely Dan's 'Do It Again,' and I use it as sort of a bait-and-hook, hoping that whatever they enjoy about the cover, that they find some glimmer of that in my originals too, because everything we do has been inspired by or been connected to the past."

During the first set, Adderley is funk to funky, with the Vintage Playboys slathering hot-buttered soul all over her arrangements of Bill Withers' "Use Me" and "Ain't No Sunshine," plus a true-to-the-original interpretation of the late Buddy Miles' "Them Changes." The well-dressed audience responds

to the breadth of her eclectic musical tastes, with Jeff Buckley's "Everybody Here Wants You" and Nina Simone's "Tell Me More and More and Then Some" proving atypical cocktail listening, and yet in the frontwoman's capable hands, the set's seamless.

That deft touch should dominate her upcoming CD, tentatively titled *Say Yes*. Adderley rhapsodizes about its guests, including guitarist Danny Anderson, Ephraim Owens on cornet, and "Big Sam" Williams and "Da Phessah" Drew Baham of Big Sam's Funky Nation. She's been trying some of her songs on audiences, with "Get Outta My Way" emerging as a favorite, along with

"Attitude" and "Easy on Me." Along the way, she gets to use her smoky, supple, and, yes, soulful voice.

"They joked I was singing before I was talking," she smiles. "I sang in choir, musical theatre. When I was in junior high school, I just started singing backup for different bands. I was never not singing. I used to sing classical music.

In high school and in the first half of college, I was training to be an opera singer.

"It took my folks a while to get behind me doing a more contemporary thing because I put so much study into classical, but they have been so incredibly supportive. I still love opera, and every now and again I will go to the opera, but if you're called by something else, what are you going to do? When I started writing, it was feeding me in a way that singing arias just wasn't.

"Being able to write my own material and perform it, and for that to be accessible to other people – there's something very powerful in that."


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

Vocalist. Songwriter. Educator.

On her business card – the one that employs a 1970s-style cartoon of her with a vinyl record in place of her trademark Afro – Akina Adderley lists her occupation as vocalist, songwriter, and educator.

This too runs through the Adderley family, beginning with her mother, who runs "the family business," the Adderley School for the Performing Arts in Santa Barbara, Calif. Her father and grandfather believed in education, and Cannonball even narrated *A Child's Introduction to Jazz* in

1961. Akina teaches music and drama at ACE Academy. She also teaches at the Lone Star School of

Music and Girls Rock Camp in the summers and conducts private lessons. One's never too old or experienced for lessons.

"I have a really good ear, and I'm trained and educated, but I wish I had better piano chops," admits the singer. "I can play, but nowhere near as good as my keyboard player or my dad, for that matter. If I were a better piano player, I'd be able to communicate certain ideas more quickly.

"In retrospect, it was really powerful to see my dad at the helm of this great adventure, calling the shots and being sensitive to everybody's musical contributions. Trying to see the best that every individual musician has to offer and really try to utilize that in the sound, especially in regard to his band leadership and his arrangements. Without even being conscious of it, I took that. I like being a band leader and sharing a vision. Not just being a leader, but a leader who embraces everything that everybody else brings to the entity.

"Part of what I enjoy about band-leading is seeing how people respond and find the

value in what I am trying to communicate. When I'm teaching, I imbue performing and writing in there as

well because that's where I'm coming from. A lot of people have an artistic/performance job and then their day job, and never the two shall meet. I feel very fortunate that I don't feel like I have the day job where I slave away and I'm unhappy. ...

"It makes me feel like I'm trying to do something on this Earth."












MY MORNING JACKET Circuital (ATO)

In the dozen years since debut long-player The Tennessee Fire sparked My Morning Jacket's rise out of Louisville, Ky., the quintet redefined Southern rock for the new millennium in a reverb-raked haze and then shredded it, becom-



ing one of the nation's top live acts along the way. By naming sixth studio LP Circuital, Jim James' gang consciously calls for comparisons to the band's earlier catalog, and indeed, much of the album evokes MMJ's roots more so than the guitars on 2005's Z or the absurd, genre-bent travesty of 2008's Evil Urges. Although the group returned home for recording and much of Circuital winds an introspective and reflective air, the album's less a 360-degree recoil than it is a cycling upward. Sonically, the band lays in rich, lush grooves, from the slowburned surge of opener "Victory Dance" into the beautifully wrought turns of the title track, culling classic James wails with an intoxicating brew of 1970s-inspired strums. Circuital's first half unfolds a pace of mellow, spiritually redeeming visions via "The Day Is Coming" and "Wonderful (The Way I Feel)" before ceding to the amusing narrative of reformed delinquency on "Outta My System" and the riveting, funkinfused calamity of "Holdin On to Black Metal," both contorting unexpectedly and yet thrilling where similar reaches on Evil Urges flailed. "First Light" scrawls a fuzzed bass line against the sway of "You Wanna Freak Out," fading into the smoky wistfulness of closers "Slow Slow Tune" and "Movin Away." Ultimately, Circuital charts My Morning Jacket's return home with success now firmly under their belts, proving they've lost none of their Southern-jammed charm while perched atop the second act of an already sky-high career.

FLEET FOXES

Helplessness Blues (Sub Pop)

Fleet Foxes' Sun Giant EP in 2008 took Beach Boys harmonies monastic with a rolling, chiming, Pacific Northwest folk begging instant timelessness. Two months later, the Seattle band's eponymous LP flourished with a rich renaissance of indie roots and



blues, bandleader Robin Pecknold following in the reverb-gilded footsteps of My Morning Jacket's Jim James and Band of Horses' Ben Bridwell in voicing Neil Young into a choir of restless ascension. Helplessness Blues pines for Fleet Foxes kills "White Winter Hymnal" and "He Doesn't Know Why," but that's a relative fault given the group's thrilling ambition. Where its predecessor corralled modern versions of The Canterbury Tales that the band's foxhunting moniker continues to evoke, Pecknold's Helplessness relies on a suitelike flow in the absence of greatest hits. Taking a page from the Neil Young songbook on opener "Montezuma," the frontman's opening melancholic ("So now I am older/Than my mother and father/When they had their daughter/Now what does that say about me?"), and chorus ("Oh man what I used to be/ Oh man oh my oh me!"), leaves little doubt as to the price of following up a critical smash. "Bedouin Dress" laces Middle Eastern accents into the baggage its fictional setting evokes in a word alone - Innisfree - the mythic invocation making a bookend return at album's end on "The Shrine/An Argument." "Sim Sala Bim" arcs a delicate Simon & Garfunkel introduction into full-on "Bridge Over Troubled Water" - sans the anthemics - after which connective pieces and instrumentals overtake the song craft. Even the energetic strum of the title track never digs its hooks deep enough despite the lyrical orchard of its second movement achieving a Biblical weight. Side two falls together better with the bittersweet "Lorelai" waltzing through the best and brightest hook here ("So, guess I got old/I was like trash on the sidewalk"), and more early Paul Simon-esque showing in the abstract beauty of "Someone You'd Admire." Closer "Grown Ocean" swells and crashes, as uncontained as the rest of Helplessness Blues.

CHAOS IN TEJAS

Here, there, everywhere, June 2-5

Punk and metal don't mingle much outside the actual musicians inciting all the moshing. Each strain infects the other irrevocably. And yet one would be hard-pressed to identify the crossover between the black-clad horde of hellhounds gathered Friday night at Emo's for death metal legacy Autopsy and the maelstrom of preppies and punks assembled Sunday at Mohawk for Fucked Up. A one-man South by Southwest, Chaos in Tejas organizer Timmy Hefner made both shows, and by the looks of his subtle but ubiquitous presence all weekend, he may have been at every single show staged from Antone's to the Scoot Inn. Spring in the live music capital is murder: SXSW, Old Settler's Music Festival, Austin Psych Fest, Pachanga. Insatiable Austin. Like March madness, though, only Chaos in Tejas traffics in the unknowable, not just by booking foreign and underground acts, but also in the alchemy of gathering them all into our presently boil-

ing cauldron over one insane weekend. SXSW and Chaos share that built-in sense that no matter how revolutionary the talent you're witnessing, there's a dozen equally revelatory acts you're missing. Local metallurgists Mammoth Grinder straddle both sides of the Chaos coin, sharing members with hardcore mongers Hatred Surge yet augmented inside Red 7 on Thursday's opening night with an Iron Age axe-grinder. Just as the

quartet touched off a mosh on the absolute tear of its opener, outside at the same venue an altogether different grouping began overlapping with the early UK R&B gone punk of the OBN III's - the Yardbirds meet the Huns. "I know there's a metal show inside that's way more appealing," panted local namesake Orville Bateman Neeley, "but really, metal is 'No Way To Rock 'n' Roll." Pavlovian chants on the order of "I can't wait till you shut up!" proved their point straight into the lens of Matador A&R Austinite Gerard Cosloy's iPhone. Indiana post-punk/postrock/post-pop foursome TV Ghost rocked and writhed behind the rooster-red shock of hair sprouting from frontman Tim Gick – visions of a young Charlie Sexton – but inside metal proved a viable way to headbang, with death and doom reigning from Olympia, Wash., (Bone Sickness) and San Francisco (Acephalix) all the way to Denmark (Undergang) and Finland (Hooded Menace). Slipping a roofie into Friday's happy hour,

UK veterans Orange Goblin leavened their Black Sabbath/ Deep Purple bog rock with a charge of Steppenwolf, "They Come Back (Harvest of Skulls)" the latest in zombie chic. Across Downtown at Fifth and the Home of the Blues, Syrian marketplace Omar Souleyman demonstrated to an Antone's throng why his wedding-singer karaoke rocks the casbah from the Middle East to the Southwest. Autopsy afterward at Emo's, while somewhat hackneyed on a newly recorded return to form in Macabre Eternal, devastated downstairs at punk/metal central with a faster cut of metallic gore than era counterparts Obituary, whose sundering at Sixth and Red River last year ground with a similarly industrial inevitability. Saturday again at Emo's, three of the four Japanese bands making sushi of Chaos that night clustered before, during, and after a genuine hardcore punk convergence at Mohawk for Youth of Today. "Do you guys have the stage-diving app?" wondered YOT's voice of reason, Ray Cappo, barking out asphalt slabs of rhythmic throb and punch. "Disengage," "Break Down the Walls," and trademark 7 Seconds cover and closer "Young Till I Die" tested the local mettle, with at least one Fun Fun Fun Fest booker leaping

> joyfully off the stage during the hour's worth of greatest fits. The brimming venue, a war zone of testosteronetossed bodies, rained Lone Star and sweat. Art-punk mascara smearing from Origin of M (Hiroshima), free-punk spazz off Isterismo (Tokyo), and hardcore melodic ruin by Kriegshög (also Tokyo) battened down Emo's outside, while in the front room the Mercyful Fatalisms of Iron Age packed the pit and pierced eardrums, frontman Jason Tarpey like some Norse horn of the Valkyries. Nagasaki-born trio Guitar

Wolf boogied a furious amalgam of Ramones/Stooges/Radio Birdman outdoors at Red 7, leather-clad singer Seiji shaking, quaking, and stage-diving, an alternate Elvis complete with "Rock & Roll" stamped in steel studs on his belt. Sunday raged Chaos beginning before noon, but the dinner hour belonged to Mohawk as more punk-bred Tokyo takedowns, the Slowmotions, set the stage for Fucked Up. "I love this city," proclaimed the Toronto sextet's big, bearish motivator Damian Abraham, well into the hourlong vortex of his self-made mosh outside. "You should come to Canada. We don't have to pay for medicine. I'd trade all the free health care in Canada for a Torchy's franchise" Boutique tacos and the band's infectious, buzz-saw abandon - Broken Social Scene gone Monotonix? - equals hardcore heaven in Abraham's shamaniac appeal and David Lee Roth stage antics. Chaos in Tejas is Fucked Up. - Raoul Hernandez



LEAD STORY

Ellenbeth Wachs, 48, was arrested in Lakeland, Fla., in May on a complaint that she "simulated" a sex act in front of a minor. In a March incident, Wachs was awakened at 8:30am by a 10-year-old neighbor boy's clamorous basketball game, near Wachs' window. After unsuccessfully beseeching the boy to quiet, Wachs - hoping, perhaps, to make a point about noisy neighbors – began moaning out the window (while remaining out of sight), "Oh, John! Oh! John!" over and over at increased shrillness as if in the throes of orgasm. The basketball-playing stopped, but the incident was not a teaching moment. The boy's father, Otto Lehman, called the police and filed for an order of protection against Wachs.

COMPELLING EXPLANATIONS

Dalia Dippolito, 30, of Boynton Beach, Fla., was convicted in May of hiring a hit man to kill her husband, but not before offering an ultramodern defense: Her lawyer told the jury that it was all a fake scheme to pitch a reality-TV show about one spouse's ordering a hit on the other (and that her husband, Michael, had originally come up with the idea). As Dippolito's plan unfolded, her boyfriend alerted police, who set up a sting and witnessed Dippolito dictating exactly what she wanted done. (In fact, the sting itself was captured on video for the Cops TV show.) Michael denied any involvement, and the jury appeared not to give her story any credence.

Wrong Impressions: 1) The Sergeants Benevolent Association, fighting back in April against corruption charges (that its NYPD officers often "fix" traffic tickets for celebrities, high-up officials, and selected friends), claimed in a recorded message reported in The New York Times that such fixes are merely "courtesy," not corruption. 2) A 20-year-old Jersey City, N.J., gym member claimed "criminal sexual contact" in March, acknowledging that while she had given a male club therapist permission to massage her breasts and buttocks, she had been under the impression that he was gay. When another gym member told her that the therapist had a girlfriend, she called the police.

Quite a Disease, That Lyme: 1) Marilyn Michose, 46, was referred for medical evaluation in May after she was spotted roaming the lobby of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City wearing neon pink panties on top of her street clothes, with a .25-caliber Beretta visible in her jacket pocket, and speaking gibberish. According to Michose's mother, Marilyn had overmedicated for her Lyme disease. 2) A restraining order to keep away from Sarah Palin and her family was extended in May against Shawn Christy, 19, of McAdoo, Pa., by a magistrate in Anchorage, Alaska. Christy has admitted to traveling to Alaska to meet Palin, to making numerous telephone calls to her, and to once threatening to sexually assault her. According to a 2009 psychiatric evaluation ordered by the Secret Service, Christy appeared to suffer from "latent onset" Lyme disease.



"Dog Stylist" Dara Foster ("I show people how to live together with their dogs in a stylish way") told a TV audience recently that some dog owners are dressing their pooches in "'80s-inspired punk," "giving way to a grunge movement in dog fashion - I swear to God." The ubiquitous TV guest and apparel designer estimates that since Americans already spend \$47 billion a year on pets, they need more than ever to know what's hot - fluorescent styling gel, for example, and precooked meals for dogs, and owners getting matching tattoos with their dogs, and a recently spotted synthetic mullet wig for dogs.

IRONIES

Jail officials in Erie County, N.Y., suspended guards Lawrence Mule, a 26-year veteran, and James Conlin, a 29-year veteran, after they scuffled at the County Correctional Facility on April 21, reportedly over a bag of chips. An inmate had to break up the fight.

An anti-terrorism drill scheduled for Pottawattamie County, Iowa, in March, which was to practice community coordination after an attack by a hypothetical white supremacist group angry about illegal immigration, had to be canceled. The sheriff said callers claiming to be white supremacists were angry at being picked on as "terrorists" and had threatened a school in Treynor, Iowa, with an attack that closely resembled the kind of imagined attack that would have preceded the simulated drill.

In April, officials in the northern Swedish city of Angermanland temporarily shut down the operator of a colonic cleansing service, and issued fines because it was not up to code. It had insufficient restroom facilities, thus requiring some of its clients to cleanse their colons in front of other clients.

The lawyer for Charles Wilhite expressed shock in a formal motion before the court after his client's murder trial in Springfield,

Mass., in April (in which Wilhite was convicted). How could it be, he asked the judge, that despite having to evaluate 19 witnesses and examine 55 pieces of evidence, the jury could so quickly have decided (after three hours total) that Wilhite and his partner Angel Hernandez were guilty? (The lawyer insinuated that the jury had thus been inattentive or biased, but did not mention the possibility that Wilhite and Hernandez were so obviously guilty that no more time was necessary.)

Shamrock, Texas, is worth exploring if you're ever near the intersection of I-40 and U.S. 83, 14 miles west of the Oklahoma border and 100 miles east of Amarillo.

Route 66 made Shamrock famous, and oil and cattle made it last. Nearly half of Wheeler County's population of about 5,000 resides in Shamrock. The folks that live here on the edge of the rippling prairies of the High Plains have a good appreciation of their history.

The town's name was suggested by an Irish sheepherder, who tried to start a post office in 1890, but his dugout home, and therefore the town, burned down. Shamrock finally sprouted in 1902 when the railroad reached the site, only it



was first called Wheeler. That name was soon taken by the county seat located 16 miles north. This year Shamrock celebrates its centennial anniversary. Like many towns in arid West Texas, a dependable water source was a big concern from the beginning. In 1915, the Chicago Bridge &

Iron Co. constructed a 75,000-gallon, 176-foot water tower near the center of town. Visible for 10 miles in any direction, it is still one of the tallest water towers in Texas.

With two railroads serving the town, Shamrock enjoyed steady growth until the oil boom in 1926. A few years later, petroleum caused another boom to the town's population. This time it was gasoline and the completion of Route 66. At the same time U.S. 83, a major north-south highway, was improved from Perryton at the top of the Panhandle to Laredo on the Rio Grande.

Local entrepreneurs took advantage of the intersection of the two major highways by building the Tower Conoco Station and U-Drop Inn and Tower Cafe. For more than 50 years the art deco service station was a welcome sight for travelers. It has been renovated by the city into a gift shop and visitors' center. The building's design is such an iconic symbol of American happy motoring that its likeness was used in the Disney cartoon movie Cars.

The stages of Shamrock's development move like a timeline from south to north. The old part of town is around the water tower. The industrial buildings of the Fifties and Sixties are along old Route 66, also known as 12th Street, or Bill Mack Boulevard after the deejay and songwriter who grew up in Shamrock. Along I-40, on the northern edge of town, is the nuevo Quicky Mart district.

One last thing that Shamrock is famous for is having a chunk of the original Blarney Stone. A town official brought it back from a visit to Ireland in 1959. Encased in a concrete monument in Elmore Park, visitors have worn the stone fragment smooth from all the kissing and rubbing. Don't miss your chance for a little luck of the Irish in Shamrock.







CONTRACTOR SISTERINGS



I've seen a lot of plays in my quarter century of watching Austin theatre, but this is the first time I recall seeing a production by the Paradox Players. The group has been around for

more than a decade now, mounting its shows on a relatively small, somewhat makeshift proscenium in the Howson Hall Theatre at First Unitarian Universalist Church of Austin, just off Burnet Road and 45th. If this production of Lee Blessing's *Independence* is any indication, and if you are at all inclined to sample the stunningly wide variety of theatrical offerings in the Austin area, you'll want to give them a look.

Here's what you can expect. You'll be greeted at the door by some really nice folks. (The Players have a huge community support system behind them, which you would expect from a theatre operating in a church.) You'll find an elevated stage but seating on the floor, so if you want a really good look at the show, you'll need to sit in the front row. You'll see a serviceable, appropriately dressed living-room set designed by Bob Bethke (I especially appreciated all the photographs on the walls) and a story about the Briggs family. Mother Evelyn (Kathleen Lawson) suffers from emotional problems that seem to stem from her relationship with her absent husband. Four years before, eldest daughter Kess (Shannon Davis), a professor at a university, had to return home to have Evelyn briefly committed to the local mental health facility, and now Kess has returned again to take care of middle daughter Jo (Christina Leidel), who has broken her neck because her mother pushed her. Youngest daughter Sherry (Courtney Outlaw) is a rebel who

drinks and carouses for a living and plans on getting out of the house – and away from the possessive Evelyn – the moment she graduates from high school. Jo would like to leave as well, but she's at loose ends. Pregnant by her boyfriend, she knows that if she marries him, she's stuck with Evelyn in Independence, lowa, for the rest of her life.

Blessing's script effectively mixes comedy and drama, and director Lisa Foster stages the play well, so there are some believable emotional moments as well as some great laughs to be had. Given that the performance is at a church, I was surprised at the sometimes racy language and subject matter, but it's so nice to know that the good people at this church can be accepting and supportive of more radical points of view. One thing that isn't radical is the message in Blessing's play. We all need our independence - we humans seem to function best when we feel like we have at least a little bit of a handle on our lives and world. And Lawson, Davis, Leidel, and Outlaw handle the script with care, utilizing a driving yet controlled tempo to keep the action always moving forward. This is especially true of Lawson. She brings a precise simplicity to the role of Evelyn. She never plays crazy. She trusts Blessing's script and trusts herself, and we feel like we're watching a mother lose her family. Because sometimes you have to take your independence, and sometimes you have your independence thrust upon you. - Barry Pineo

Holy 1960s Batman, Batman!

Robin the Boy Hostage (as his detractors used to call him) and his mentor Bruce Wayne, aka Batman, are parodied and celebrated in full improv splendor in this latest offering from the ingenious goofballs at the Hideout Theatre.

No baroque Tim Burton crime fantasia here; no gritty Christopher Nolan vigilante realism; no goddamn Joel Schumacher *bat-nipples* to contend with. No, this comedy is based on – note the show's title – the ABC series of 1966-68, the one starring Adam West and Burt Ward, the one that was camped-up to sweet pop-cultural absurdity just as the *Batman* comic book itself was returning to a more serious vein of mythologizing.

Grant me this: All other things being equal, comedy improv is easier than serious improv. Because, for one thing, if you're doing serious improv and something doesn't mesh well or is otherwise off-kilter, it's a microfail that can render an audience apprehensive. But if the same thing happens during comedy improv, hell, it is – especially if it's handled well – part of what makes the good stuff so spontaneously hilarious.

Does it matter that Deano Jones and Kaci Beeler are terrific improvisers? Does it matter that Jones has nailed Adam West's speech and mannerisms perfectly, that Beeler has done just as well with Burt Ward's embodiment of eager sidekickery? Does it matter that the two of them, in full costume, bring unstoppable bat-power to the bat-stage for every episode of this bat-spectacle?

Of course it matters, citizen, don't be silly. But it doesn't have to matter. This is not only comedy improv, which is a send-up of reality; it's an improvised version of a send-up of superheroic unreality. So it's almost irrelevant that the ensemble of improvisers in supporting roles — Commissioner Gordon

and Chief O'Hara, various henchmen and victims and bystanders – are skilled and clever in their performances. It's almost negligible that, as in the old TV show, there's a special guest star as the villain each week and that that villain is created from audience suggestion. (But it's *not* negligible, because the villain's necessary to provoke the earnest batreaction that fuels each narrative's conflict. It's *not* negligible, because the guest villains have been, so far, top improvisers Shannon McCormick, Mike Kinald, Asaf Ronen, Tom Booker, and Shana Merlin – with Lauren Zinn, Justin Davis, and Kareem Badr yet to come.)

I mean, c'mon, this material is already comedy gold. The only way to really fuck it up would be to not capture the madcap nuances of the original series. And these guys at the Hideout have captured just that. The Dynamic Duo's sometimes contentious, obliquely homoerotic mentor-and-ward relationship; the cluelessness of the Gotham police force; the wacky gimmicks of the week's villain; the walking-up-the-side-of-a-building, complete with Sixties pop-cult cameo; the centrifugally enhanced Batmobile scenes; the deus ex machina escapes afforded by our heroes' utility belts – it's all there.

Bottom line: You don't have to be familiar with the old TV series to enjoy the hell out of this show, although, if you are, you'll enjoy it even more. Regardless of your superhero fanaticism or lack thereof, this comedy is enough to make your own inner sidekick exclaim, "Holy 'Holy 1960s Batman, Batman!," — Wayne Alan Brenner

It's not true that David Berman met with Jill Schroeder last year, in some shadowy dive bar or otherwise, and said: "Look, I'm moving the D Berman Gallery to Wimberley in about

a year, so I'd like you to open an Austin visual-arts venue of your own that's remarkably similar, in its spare elegance and generosity of display space, to what I'm vanishing from the ATX. By way of, you know, compensation."

At least, acknowledging that nobody can prove a negative, we're pretty sure that conversation never happened. And yet, here's grayDUCK Gallery, opened little more than a year ago and run by Schroeder on Monroe Street off South First, and the similarity of physical space and aesthetic vibe provoke a certain déjà vu, especially if one is a recalcitrant art lover visiting the venue for the

But also, part of the similarity is due to the quality of the artwork on display in the current "Rock, Paper, Carbon" show. Which is to say: Quality? Yes, top quality.

"Natural forms, genetic modification, flickering conversation, and molecular structures are all explored in this organic show," says the gallery's info sheet. What's left unsaid is that these "explorations," which is sometimes a code word for haphazard expression of whatever, are not just messing around. What's left unsaid, but which the eye can discern with scrutiny, is that the amount of craft that went into these explorations is more than equal to their considerable beauty, and that beauty is the result of the thought that drove the process of craft.

Sabra Booth limns natural forms - delicate Finnish plants, dried Japanese fungi onto fine paper with pen and ink and watercolor, for starters, then sometimes adds gouache, spray paint, and collage to the illustrative methods, rendering the floral images toward realism or realistic silhouette with a combination of precision and verve.

Margaret Craig provides colorful and complex displays of her vision of existence, a

vision that includes the interiors of objects in an almost X-rayed fashion, overlapping the micro and the macro, suggesting (as she puts it) the "translucent membranes on which the universe resides and puckers." Each piece is created with a variety of techniques sufficient to earn a black belt in printing: etching, marbling, chine colle, digital transfer, and collograph. And that's just her two-dimensional works. Craig also makes sculptures of jellyfishlike creatures by manipulating hand-printed sheets and strands of epoxy resin; these hang eerily from the ceiling near one corner of the gallery.

Daniel Kaplan also works in three dimensions, and his creations set up another resonance of Berman in the grayDUCK. You ever wonder if a person could create something that was wholly their own – whatever that means in this interconnected life - that wasn't lamely derivative but that nonetheless reminded you of Lance Letscher's work? Like maybe you armchair-quarterbacked the last Letscher show, going "No, damnit, he should've done this instead of that; he should've forged into that new territory, not this one," y'know? Imagine someone fulfilling those desires with papier mâché tubes, some of which resemble lengths of calligraphy made flesh. It's like this: Whoa.

And then there are Leigh Anne Lester's works, and we can feel the universe residing on the membrane of a single equation: skill + simplicity = brilliance. Lester perfectly draws botanical specimens on carbon paper; then she affixes the marked black paper, reversed, next to the image she's created on white paper. So much beauty out of fierce precision and caring.

It's not true that I recently met with Lester, Kaplan, Craig, Booth, and Schroeder, in some shadowy dive bar or otherwise, to toast their health and continued success. But I do it here with much admiration. - Wayne Alan Brenner

Quite simply, Midnight in Paris is charming – très charmant, to ape the argot of the locals. I say that somewhat tongue-in-cheek, as this is very much an outsider's valentine to the City of Lights. Witness the opening shots of Paris at its most picture-postcardesque – the Eiffel Tower, Sacré-Coeur, the Arc de Triomphe.

That would be enough to make most tourists swoon, but Gil (Wilson), a would-be novelist on vacation with his no-nonsense fiancée Inez (McAdams), has a very specific fantasy in mind: Paris in the Twenties in the rain. Gil, it seems, suffers from something Allen calls "Golden Age thinking," an ineffable ache for a time and place he's never known. During the day, Gil and Inez putter around like regular tourists, checking out this and that, accompanied by one of Inez's former classmates, an affected prat named Paul (marvelously played by Sheen) who likes to play impromptu docent at galleries with the opening line "If I'm not mistaken ..." (and he usually is). These scenes aren't negligible - delivered at a rat-a-tat clip, they mark some of the least self-conscious comedy writing Allen's done in a decade - but it's the nighttime where Midnight in Paris really hits its stride. As the clock strikes midnight, Gil discovers quite by accident a portal of sorts into the 1920s. There, he boozes it up with Ernest Hemingway (Stoll, killing it), finds a first reader for his manuscript in Gertrude Stein, and on a lark pitches future filmmaker Luis Buñuel the plot of the eternally baffling The Exterminating Angel ("But what does it mean?!" Buñuel puzzles after him - indeed). This stretch of the film, when Gil realizes his wildest fantasy and rubs elbows with his cultural touchstones, not only is a riot, but also

> feels like deeply personal filmmaking for Allen, and Wilson plays his surrogate without turning to the bespectacled one's famous tics. It's not all strictly la vie en rose: A tentative love affair between Gil and the Twenties-stuck muse played by Marion Cotillard pokes

along – Allen's women are either too soft or too hard, never just right - and it's easy to anticipate the film's dramatic beats. But considering Allen hasn't made an unqualified success since 1999's Sweet and Lowdown, it's easy to shrug off Midnight in Paris' occasional fumble when weighed against so much cleverness and canniness and, bien sûr, irresistible charm.

THE DOUBLE HOUR D: Giuseppe Capotondi; with Ksenia Rappoport, Filippo Timi, Antonia Truppo, Gaetano Bruno, Fausto Russo Alesi. (NR, 96 min.,

Red herrings abound in The Double Hour, an Italian psychological mystery that features two terrific performances by Rappoport and Timi. The film tells the story of two lonely people, Sonia (Rappoport) and Guido (Timi), in Turin, who find love after meeting at a speed-dating event. At least that's the story as it's initially presented to us. Then an art theft occurs while the couple is courting on the acreage of a grand estate where Guido, a cop turned security guard, works. Guido is killed in the course of the robbery, and Slovenian immigrant Sonia returns to her dreary job as a hotel chambermaid. But maybe some of these details are an illusion or a dream or the result of intentional misdirection. Certainly, the detective who was Guido's former colleague (Alesi) thinks there was something suspicious about the crime, although he's unable to pin down his hunch. The Double Hour is difficult to discuss without giving away its twists and turns. You never exactly learn what each character knows or when they knew it, or what pieces of the story are relevant to the mystery and which are mere distractions. Suffice it to say that when examined in retrospect, it doesn't seem as though the film's calculations add up to anything of real substance. Those who enjoy being yanked this way and that may find the film's red herrings a personal delight, but others will just feel manipulated. Director Giuseppe Capotondi, who makes his feature film debut after a career spent as a photographer and director of commercials and music videos, predominantly films the characters in close-ups and tight shots. Although watching Rappoport and Timi's faces is an appealing activity in and of itself, their expressions never reveal the answers for which we're looking. The Double Hour is ultimately a mystery box that lacks a treasure at its core.

SUPER 8 D: J.J. Abrams; with Joel Courtney, Kyle Chandler, Noah Emmerich, Elle Fanning, Ron Eldard, Riley Griffiths, Ryan Lee, Gabriel Basso, Zach Mills. (PG-13, 112 min.)

After successfully piloting two big-screen franchises. Mission: Impossible and Star Trek, toward creative revivification in recent years, writer/director J.J. Abrams in his new film Super 8 pays tribute to the early work of Steven Spielberg and that filmmaker's production company Amblin Entertainment (which also produced Super 8). While cast in the mold of late-Seventies/early Eighties films such as , E.T.: The Extra-Terrestrial, Gremlins, and The Goonies, Super 8 has a sense of being the most personal of all Abrams' projects (which include his creation of the popular TV shows Felicity, Alias, Lost, and Fringe). Super 8 is a monster movie that's a throwback to the kind in which the creature is a misunderstood interloper whose full unveiling is kept under wraps for as long as possible. While Super 8's core protagonists are a group of latetweeners/early teenagers, which also fits into the Amblin template, these particular kids are spending their summer vacation making a zombie movie for submission to a film festival. Super 8 is set in 1979, which adds to the movie's retro feel and provides its title, since the film the kids are shooting is on Super 8 stock. (A plot point pointedly reminds today's instantgratification, digital auteurs that it used to take several days to process your film at a lab before you could view your dailies.) The depiction of the kids, their film work, and their friendships are the strongest part of Super 8. Abrams shifts the action from Spielberg's suburban Americana to the Ohio rustbelt but maintains that wide-eyed sense of wonder so vital to his mentor's films. Newcomer Joel Courtney is perfectly cast as Joe Lamb, the zombie movie's special-effects expert who has recently lost his mother in a fatal steelmill accident and gets his first kiss from Alice Dainard (Fanning) as he applies her zombie makeup. In fact, all the kids are great, with particularly standout work by Fanning, Griffiths as the bossy director who hired Alice because of his crush on her, and Lee as the group's pyrotechnically inclined scene-stealer. Like Spielberg, one of Abrams' great strengths is his knack for perfect casting. While out filming one night at the abandoned railroad tracks, the kids witness a spectacular crash caused by a truck stalled in the path of an oncoming train. It's the beginning of the destruction of their town by the mysterious cargo on the train and the further alarm created by the ominous military men who swoop in and try to harness the disaster. Joe's father, Jackson Lamb (Chandler of Friday Night Lights), is the town's deputy sheriff and is stymied in his efforts to solve the strange occurrences and sudden disappearances of various townspeople (and all the community's dogs). Of course. the disaster also has a way of reuniting discordant families (much as it did for Fanning's sister, Dakota, and Tom Cruise in Spielberg's War of the Worlds), although Abrams' emotional resolutions seem pat and hollow. Ultimately, it's the period and

character details in Super 8 that provide the grist for its winning formula, rather than its emotional arc and monster jolts.

X-MEN: FIRST CLASS D: Matthew Vaughn; with James McAvoy, Michael Fassbender, Kevin Bacon, Rose Byrne, Jennifer Lawrence, January Jones, Nicholas Hoult, Zoë Kravitz, Oliver Platt. (PG-13, 131 min.)

The first time the Marvel comic X-Men was transposed to screen in 2000, director Bryan Singer cast two of England's most vaunted thespian-graybeards, Patrick Stewart and Ian McKellen, as Professor Xavier and Erik Lensherr - as unlikely a pair a person could imagine to anchor a film about mutant-leadersturned-mortal-enemies. In this origin story, set primarily in the early Sixties, director Matthew Vaughn gooses summer blockbuster expectations further by enlisting two arthouse hotties, James McAvoy (Atonement) and Michael Fassbender (Hunger), to portray youthful versions of, respectively, Professor X, who reads minds, and Erik, who bends metal as his alias Magneto. Yes, yes, they can act (certainly more persuasively than Mad Men's January Jones, who underemotes to the corner of catatonia as a mutant baddie with the ability to turn to diamond), but let's be clear: The tight-pantsed pair are eye candy for Masterpiece Theatre enthusiasts, and how often can you say that about a summer movie? Although, truth be told, X-Men: First Class feels less like a movie and more like a series of preambles, especially in its hopscotching first third. It never quite catches a rhythm but glides by on the strength of its personalities; Jennifer Lawrence (Winter's Bone) and Nicholas Hoult (A Single Man) are especially moving as two teens struggling with the physical manifestations of their mutations. (In an otherwise stellar-looking film, Hoult's final transformation into the hirsute Beast is a letdown.) It's all vastly superior to Brett Ratner's scorched-earth X-Men: The Last Stand, of course. But new blood and swinging Sixties milieu aside, X-Men: First Class never finds a fresh way to sell the same message we've been hearing since the first X-Men, about loving the skin you're in, even - or especially - if it's blue. Admirable, to be sure, but when placed next to the other overfamiliar plot points - humans fearful of mutants, the idea of forced identification of mutants, a mad genius recruiting an army - and we're pretty definitively in broken-record country. BRIDESMAIDS D: Paul Feig; with Kristen Wiig, Maya Rudolph, Rose Byrne, Chris O'Dowd, Melissa McCarthy, Ellie Kemper, Wendi McLendon-Covey, Jon Hamm. (R. 125 min.)

Bridesmaids is a delicious confection that artfully swirls vulgarity with sincerity. Comic actress Kristen Wiig's hapless heroine Annie, mired in debt after losing the cake shop she owned with a boyfriend who subsequently abandoned her, sees her circumstances grow even bleaker when her childhood best friend, Lillian (Rudolph), announces her engagement. She names Annie her maid of honor, but there's competition for the crown in the form of Lillian's new friend, Helen (Byrne). This relentlessly funny film mines material from the ludicrousness of the "wedding industrial complex," but it doesn't restrict its scope to matrimonial yuks, smartly placing the other bridesmaids (Kemper, McLendon-Covey, and McCarthy) as counterpoints on the continuum of a woman's life, from newlywed to sex-starved mom. In an age of doggedly unambitious comedy, one marvels at the finesse first-time screenwriters Wiig and Annie Mumolo and director Feig (Freaks and Geeks) bring to marrying raunch, romantic comedy, and the tested but ever-true bond between women. CAVE OF FORGOTTEN DREAMS D: Werner Herzog. (NR, 90 min.)

Lions and bison and bears! Oh my! Such images join other remnants of prehistoric life that were drawn on the walls of the Cave of Chauvet-Pontd'Arc in southern France, probably some 30,000 years ago. Generally believed to be the oldest examples of human artwork yet discovered, the images convey a powerful sense of mystery and awe. Because of the harmful effects of exposure to the 21st century, access to the Chauvet Cave is permitted only to a very select sample of geologists, art historians, anthropologists - and Werner Herzog. What this audacious filmmaker emerges with is an amazing investigation into what makes human beings tick, no matter the millennium. To a large extent, Cave of Forgotten Dreams is





A little-known chapter of American history is examined in The Conspirator and scrutinized for its relevance to contemporary national issues. Handled with Redford's hallmark deliberateness, The Conspirator illuminates historical events surrounding the trial of Mary Surratt (Wright), the owner of the boarding house where John Wilkes Booth, the assassin of Abraham Lincoln, met frequently with his confederates to plan their actions. In the aftermath, Surratt was imprisoned and tried in a military tribunal rather than a civil court. The viewers' surrogate in this drama is Surratt's defense counsel, Frederick Aiken (McAvoy), a Union war hero and aspiring attorney who slowly begins to doubt the woman's guilt. Should any of this call to mind America's post-9/11 fears and the quagmire faced by the prisoners at Guantánamo Bay, you're heading in the direction that Redford planned. Everything Must Go isn't a comedy, but it's not entirely a tragedy, either, and it straddles this razor's edge with a deeply nuanced aplomb. Nawal left some peculiar burial instructions and two envelopes: one for Jeanne to deliver to their father (whom they previously believed to be dead) and one for Simon to deliver to a brother that neither knew they had. Jeanne journeys, initially alone, to their mother's unnamed Middle Eastern homeland, Many surprises surface but not until Simon joins Jeanne abroad does the ultimate revelation become manifest, and Villeneuve pulls it off in a manner that's as piercing as a sudden bolt in an ancient Greek tragedy. Sabrina Watson (Patton) and Jason Taylor (Alonso) seem to form a match made in heaven but for their polar-opposite backgrounds. In this apocalyptic nightmare, the clergy have walled their human flock into strictly governed communities while sending their priests out as vampire warriors. Now a humanvampire hybrid, Black Hat (Urban), has other plans for the social order. Priest (Bettany) and his niece's boyfriend (Gigandet) are joined in their mission by Priestess (Maggie Q), and, unfortunately, most of the movie is given over to battle sequences lacking in ingenuity or narrative drive. Bettany exudes an intensity that lays the groundwork for an interesting character, but Priest hasn't a prayer of creating anything more subtle than the giant cross tattooed on his face. In this adaptation of the first of Emily Giffin's companion novels, Something Borrowed and Something Blue, Ginnifer Goodwin is Rachel, a sweet but luckless-in-love attorney who's played second fiddle to her magnetic best friend, Darcy (Hudson), since childhood. Whatever Darcy wants, Darcy gets, including the lantern-jawed law student named Dex (Egglesfield), whom Rachel's been pining for since the first day of class. That bit of boy-snatchery is seen in flashback; the bulk of this romantic comedy from the director of The Girl Next Door is set in the weeks leading up to Dex and Darcy's wedding, as Rachel weighs the value of her friendship against the wants of her heart. Oddly, the bond between the two women hardly concerns the filmmakers. With its FM-pop soundtrack and heavy Heineken product placement, Something Borrowed is fairly uninspiring. Which isn't to imply that what Hamilton (played by Robb) experienced was a dull affair. As directed by That's So Raven's McNamara, however, the Hamilton

family's beach-based, home-schooled, surf-infused lifestyle comes across as a particularly unspecial episode of a television series that never made it past the pilot. Although the Hamiltons found refuge and strength in their Christianity, the most intriguing faith-based questions (e.g., "How could God allow a shark to bite off the arm of a devout, 13-year-old girl?") are only lightly touched upon. Faith in the divine unknowable is at the heart of Bethany Hamilton's miraculous life, but it feels like it might have been an after-thought in the minds of those behind Soul Surfer. (04/08/2011)



Screening last spring at the Alamo Drafthouse Village, *Rush: Beyond the Lighted Stage* flickered more like a film than a standard music documentary,

full of genuine humor, pathos, and drama. It also played out like comedy for an act that used to make its stage entrance to the theme from *The Three Stooges*.

Accordingly, on the Canadian power trio's present Time Machine trek, the connective video segments at the beginning, intermission, and after the last encore unfurl like long-lost SCTV sketches.

That Rush is reviving Moving Pictures is something of a ruse given that almost all the songs on the 1981 breakthrough have long been set staples, minus the neverbefore-aired "The Camera Eye," which might be worth the price of admission alone (see "Seasons in the Abyss," Earache!, Sept. 29, 2010). In San Antonio last fall, Alex (Moe), Geddy (Larry), and Neil (Curly) were hilariously on. Here are some Beyond the Lighted Stage punch lines. — Raoul Hernandez

Geddy's mother: "It wasn't my kind of music. Perry Como was my kind of music."

Quote montage on Geddy's

voice: "Hamster in overdrive," "the dead howling in Hades," "Mickey Mouse on helium," "a cat being chased out the door with a blow torch up its ass."

Geddy Lee: "We have hardcore fans – the old fans that have been there from the beginning. They're usually male and they're *really* intense."

LOW-PROFILE TIRES CAUSED BUYER'S REMORSE

Dear Tom and Ray:

When shopping for a new car, we favored the Mazda5, but my wife had one major concern: the low-profile tires. The dealer assured us they were absolutely safe and had standard tires beat. A month after purchasing this car, we caught a hidden pothole, which took out both right-side tires (sidewall bulges), rims, a front strut, and a rear shock absorber. In 60 years of driving, having met many a pothole and losing only one tire to them, we've never experienced this degree of damage (\$1,800) from a pothole. Are these low-profile tires as safe as standard tires? Or are we the guinea pigs testing these tires? - Rick

RAY: Are you sure it was just a pothole, Rick? From the amount of damage you did, it sounds like it may have been a canyon at a national park.

TOM: Or it sounds like you were going very fast when you hit this pothole.

RAY: Or both. When you hit a large pothole at high speed, no matter what kind of tires you have, you're going to do some damage.

TOM: That said, low-profile tires are more susceptible to road hazards. "Low-profile" means the sidewalls are short. This makes the sidewalls firmer, and less likely to bend and deform on turns, which results in better handling.

RAY: But the downside is that there's less space between the road and your wheels. And if you hit a pothole, jump a curb, or drive over your neighbor's granite lawn flamingo, you easily could find yourself in need of a new \$800 alloy wheel or two.

TOM: Plus, there are two other things we don't like about low-profile tires. First, they're noisier. And second, the ride is more punishing, because there's less sidewall rubber to absorb the bumps.

RAY: This is something to keep in mind when you're buying a new car. On some cars (like the Mazda5), you don't have a choice. Mazda obviously felt that the van needed the handling advantage of low-profile tires. But sometimes

you do have a choice. TOM: Dealers often will push optional "bigger wheels." But remember, bigger wheels almost always come with lower-profile tires. Why? Because if the wheels are bigger, the tires have to be smaller so the whole shebang can still fit in the wheel well.

RAY: So our advice in general is: Unless you own stock in alloy-wheel companies, stick with standard-size wheels and standard-profile tires when you have the option. Your wife was onto something, Rick.



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


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
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
