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
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# **Fact-Free Follies**

#### More fun from the wacky world of right-wing zealots

(Perception and reality, as well as the distance between them, has become the modern metaphoric Bermuda Triangle, where ideas disappear and the possibility of compromise is lost forever. One of the ironies is that many of those who insist that their perception is reality believe just as strongly in an objective reality. What they see is what there is.)

As a public figure working in almost any part of the media, you discover that many if not most consumers of the medium often prefer to take you as one-dimensional – elaborately one-dimensional, granted, but still flat and lacking depth. Now, in many ways, the very nature of public media encourages this view; the ideal media presence is someone who is easily acces-

sible and not too complex. The less ambiguity, the more cutand-dried the figures, the easier it is to love or hate them. Without substance or complexity, these media figures basically become symbols to their audiences, serving to represent the best (the good) or personify the worst (the bad).

The lack of depth usually is not accompanied by anything approaching a proportional lack of expanse. Ideological, political, religious, and social beliefs are attached to the still one-dimensional media figures, often stretching them into distorted shapes, pushing them far, wide, and flat. This is because there is little attention or respect given to them for their thoughtfulness or study. Crucial to the relationship is that the mass audience gets to believe the media figures they like agree with them on everything; the ones they don't like are not only passionately wrong on almost every issue, but their reasoning is corrupt, crudely idealistic, and just plain dumb. It doesn't even matter if these media figures have never addressed these topics in any way; their audience still knows where they stand.

When a media figure is admired, he or she just becomes more and more admirable. When the figure is a despised villain, the drive is not for reasonable treatment but to

demonize, to question not ideas but motives, not to look for compro-

mise but to attack personally.
Undermining opponents' arguments by belittling them and their beliefs means you don't ever really have to address ideas. Ann Coulter, during the recent flare-up of the controversy over the death penalty, wrote, "For decades, liberals tried persuading Americans to abolish the death penalty, using their usual argument: hysterical sob-

bing." Essentially a near-meaningless observation, to Coulter's audience it not only is funny but out of hand dismisses the complexity of the subject by mocking opponents.

Even better is to assign casually outrageous beliefs to a person you want to demean without even knowing what their beliefs really are. Jordan Smith's recent article on Rick Perry and the death penalty (see "Perry the Executioner," Sept. 16) got a large number of responses, most of which were quite interesting. Some were more ideologically loaded than others. One post reads: "Jordan Smith. I would like to remind

you that your hero and hero of the poor, Ernesto Che Guevara, also executed hundreds of people point blank with a shot to the head and personally logged and enjoyed every one of them! The only difference is that this great hero Che executed people just because they were against the 'Revolution' and I guess that was a major crime. Viva Che!"

Now where did that come from, and what is its point? It would be ridiculous to address it seriously by refuting the bizarrely out of place comparison, as well as completely inappropriate to talk about Smith's beliefs. Most likely this was written because one of the many current hard-right trends on radio and TV is to point out what an iconographic figure Guevara has become among the young and then offer a revisionist history that finds he was more murderer than revolutionary, one who covered himself by conveniently espoused ideology. Rather than reaching for a grand observation, the comment uses one of the many current right-wing talking points in an attack on leftist thought.

Think about the positions the writer is taking. Smith can't criticize the death penalty because Che killed people? This argues that everyone is required to know, understand, and vet every thought and activity of those they admire when those people make any kind of political, ethical, or ideological statement – even if there is

no reference to said person in the statement. Or something like that. But of course it's really not arguing that; it is designed to assault and demean liberal thought, not to address ideas.

I'm regularly asked about a four-year-old YouTube clip, "Alex Jones vs. Louis Black." It is a filmed clip from his radio show, posted by Jones, where he whips himself up into a frenzy as he denounces me.

"I just walked down the hall to get a cup of coffee, and what did I see? Louis Black - that's a fake name by the way." Holding up the Chronicle with the "Journey of a Gun" cover (Oct. 5, 2007), he goes on: "And what's it got? A giant cover story about how we need to attack the Second Amendment, a bunch of anti-gun garbage I just scanned through in the last few minutes, the establishment's instinct to totally disarm us so they have their way with us." Then Jones asks why I don't write articles on some of the stories he regularly espouses. But really, he's only just begun. "Why don't you tell the truth instead of writing articles saying the toll road company isn't foreign?" he asks. "How dumb do you think your readers are?" And then he blasts off in outraged-Jones mode: "I'm just sick of lies. I'm sick of it. And I'm sick of you being mesmerized by things that don't matter so they can run these lies on you."


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

Where to begin? This was Jones at his most brilliant during a debate because: 1) I wasn't in the studio, 2) I hadn't written the story in question (Jordan Smith had), 3) Jones had no idea what I thought about gun control but denounced me anyway, and 4) because Alex Jones does not have opinions but knows the truth, most things that appear on his websites or that he says faithfully represent his philosophy. I, on the other hand, own no truths. I have only opinions, and Chronicle writers are frequently in disagreement with me, as well as with other writers.


There is no quarter here, even given as controversial a topic as gun control. This is not a matter of principled disagreement between citizens of this republic. No, it is the always truth-teller (just ask him) waging his endless campaigns against all who disagree with him: It's not that they are wrong or stupid; it is that they are intentionally evil.

It is no wonder that Jones so vehemently insists on the resurrection and redemption of former Sen. Joe McCarthy. They both find that a great way to hit levels of nearspitting vitriol is to make phony accusations. He accuses me of writing articles that declare that the toll road company isn't foreign. If he can find a single example of such, well, then I'll apologize.

Finally, quite offhandedly he asserts, "Louis Black - a fake name by the way."

[Re: "Council Opponents Concede on WTP4," News, Sept. 23]: The study on the costs of postponing completion of Water Treatment Plant No. 4 was fatally flawed. Virtually any ongoing construction project, regardless of how ill-conceived it is, will be cheaper to finish immediately than to finish after mothballing it for several years.

The fatal flaw in the study is that it did not consider abandoning the project completely.

The supercollider north of Waco is a good example of deciding that a project already well under way was not worth completing. In 1993, Congress decided that project, conceived during the Cold War, was no longer justified, even though almost \$2 billion had been spent and 14 miles of tunnel had been dug.

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



# **Voter Suppression Made Easy**

#### Hold the election when everybody votes? No way.

You might think the Austin City Council would leap at the chance to increase voter turnout for its increasingly invisible municipal elections, especially since Austin council members never miss a chance to give lip service to greater public engagement and participation. It's supposedly what

our civic life is known for - we all love taking part in the public's business, and we all want to know everything there is to know about city government.

As a matter of painful fact, if you believe any of that, I've got a bridge over Lady Bird Lake to sell you.

As Wells Dunbar reports in "City Hall Hustle," p.18, last week council, presented with a golden and easy opportunity to increase voter turnout in next year's council elections by six- or sevenfold, pondered the matter at length and decided ... nah. Given a temporary opportunity by the Legislature to move the May election date - for which turnout has been hovering around a pathetic 10% for several years - to November, when turnout for the coincident state and federal contests will be in the 65% range or

better, council voted 4-3 to stick with the boutique date. Now there's a vote of confidence in public

participation, eh? The context is that Senate Bill 100, intend-

ed to allow more time for overseas and military voters, altered next year's election calendar so that state

> and federal primaries and the city election will be crowded together, especially if there are run-offs (or, potentially, contested outcomes). Local jurisdictions were therefore enabled to move to November should they choose, even if their city

charters specify a May date (as does Austin's). Since Austin is already formally discussing charter proposals that would

change the calendar, perhaps move to single-member districts, and so on, it would seem to make perfect sense to avoid the crush and to take advantage of the greater turnout (and lesser expense) of a combined November date - when other city matters might also be on the ballot.

Perfect sense, that is, except to four members of the current council: Mayor Pro Tem Sheryl Cole, Bill Spelman, Laura Morrison, and Kathie Tovo.


#### **Unchartered Waters**

The reasons the majority gave for standing pat were basically three: 1) the charter says May; 2) we shouldn't vote, in effect, to extend our own terms; and 3) the November election will be too confusing and polarizing for local voters - in essence, May quality is better than November quantity.

In the first instance, since state law controls in this case, the august appeals to the continued on p.18

#### Headlines

- No City Council meeting today all the better, since council members are still recovering from a bruising debate over when to hold the city's next mayoral election (see "City Hall Hustle," p.18). A split council voted to keep elections in May despite the potential for increased expenses, but passed it on first reading only; the measure returns for final adoption at council's next meeting, Oct. 6.
- Speaking of elections: A steering committee in support of Travis County Propositions 1 and 2 was announced this week, encouraging voters to do the "Travis Two-Step" this November. At \$133 million, Prop. 1 pays for safety improvements on roadways and bridges, school routes, sidewalks, and flood prevention; Prop. 2, at \$82 million, is for open space acquisition and water-quality protection.
- ➤ AISD trustees voted on Sept. 26 to extend Superintendent Meria Carstarphen's contract by one year, through July 30, 2014, despite opposition from trustees Robert Schneider and Annette LoVoi. The motion was a last-minute addition to Monday's schedule, surprising trustees, who expected a discussion next month.
- > No sooner had the Belmont announced its closing than Austinites say farewell to three more Downtown institutions this week. First, Emo's owner Frank Hendrix confirmed on Sept. 26 that he had sold the venerable Red River venue: then management at the **Hickory Street Bar and** Grill on Congress and Charlie's, a long-standing gay bar in the shadow of the Capitol, both announced they will close this weekend.
- After years of writing and wrangling, the city has unveiled a draft of the Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan. The first complete overhaul of planning policy since 1979's Austin Tomorrow document, the 197-page plan is available for download at www.imagineaustin.net. A kick-off party is this Saturday; see "Civics 101," p.18.
- At press time, a U.S. State Department hearing was under way at UT on the **Keystone XL tar** sands pipeline proposed along East Texas properties and wetlands; opponents include environmentalists, religious leaders, and eminentdomain-wary tea party activists.
- > It's been a bad week for Gov. Rick Perry's presidential aspirations. After a rambling performance in the Sept. 22 debate, Perry got spanked by a 2-to-1 ratio by Herman Cain in the Florida straw poll, and now is reported to be severely trailing former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney in fundraising.
- A UT fraternity is being sued by the national Kappa Alpha Order. The Texas branch of the fraternity broke off in June to become **Texas** Omicron after allegations of hazing and live sex shows, and now the national body says it wants the frat house on Leon Street, plus its contents and outstanding dues, back.

charter seem sanctimonious. There's nothing sacred about May (Spelman acknowledged we no longer even know why it was originally chosen), and besides, council regularly "violates the charter" when - as authorized under state law - it issues bonds or takes similar actions without a popular vote. Worse, the substance of the charter has been steadily undermined in recent years precisely by the shrinking electorate. Since it takes only 5% of the previous record vote to submit charter-revision petitions, political hobbyists of all stripes have an increasingly easy detour around substantive organizing or even voter mobilization. Why elect new council members or build coalitions when you can just write the law yourself? (Indeed, yet another DIY charterrewrite-by-rump threatens this spring.)

The council objection to term extension makes somewhat more sense, although it too founders both on the state exemption and, more substantially, on the numbers: Here's a sure opportunity to extend the effective franchise to a much broader electorate, especially if the November election comes to include charter changes and a bond vote. Trading a few months' time for a tangible mandate seems more than worth the exchange.

The final reason - that November voters will be overwhelmed by state and national elections, and presidential polarization will overshadow the city campaign and candidates - is frankly indefensible on its face and even ludicrous in light of the regular bond or charter elections already held in November. Indeed, pending springtime foolishness, there will likely be a charter election next November, as Spelman wryly acknowledged to me: "I understand the inconsistency in the argument, believe me. I'm laughing at myself - I understand."

#### **By Invitation Only**

There's also an inevitable political backstory, although it's a dubious one.

Mayor Lee Leffingwell, Mike Martinez, Spelman, and Cole will all be up for reelection next year, and both Spelman and Cole have expressed some interest in running for mayor. Leffingwell and Martinez are widely presumed to be more vulnerable in May than November - especially by the tiny and professionally incestuous group of Austin political consultants responsible in some combination for the campaigns of every single current council member. There is no doubt that these folks were whispering in their clients' ears in advance of last week's vote - as Dunbar reports, one of them, Dean Rindy, pushed the "uninformed November voters" argument also heard from the dais. (There was also an explosion of similar arguments on social media sites in the wake of the council vote.)

Whatever else these insiders like, they particularly like the May electorate - precisely because it's smaller, narrower, more central-city, and much more predictable and manageable than those big and undisciplined November numbers. As Martinez pointed out, the May vote is also older, whiter, wealthier, and frankly less representative than November's - all good reasons, one would presume, in this city rhetorically devoted to "participation," to take a brave chance on including as many people as possible.

The May standing-pat, on a motion by Morrison, passed only on first reading - it will take two more to confirm it. I'll take it on faith that no council member was voting solely her or his personal political interest last week, and that each one argued and voted for what each believes is best for Austin. Nevertheless, it would be gratifying to see council formally acknowledge that there is an undeniable, structural crisis in those May turnout numbers. Having spent much of the spring telling legislators that discouraging voters is a really bad idea, council should think long and hard before doing the same.

## Rock the Vote! ... Not

#### COUNCIL PUNTS ON NOVEMBER BALLOT

Ten percent.

That's a rough take on how many Austinites make it to the polls for City Council elections - and a percentage council tacitly endorsed last week, voting 4-3 to keep the city's next contest in May instead of moving it to November 2012. A potential change to November had been allowed by **Senate** Bill 100. a state law enacted by the 82nd Legislature that has rearranged federal primaries and potentially clustered elections (and potential runoffs) impossibly close together.

The politics of when to hold an election have become inseparable from the policy. with many observers speculating that Mayor Lee Leffingwell and Council Member Mike

Martinez stand a better chance of re-election in a high-turnout November election rather than a May contest. Typically, about 10% or so of Austinites turn out for May elections, making them more winnable for candidates backed by better organized Central Austin neighborhood associations and environmental and other activist groups.

Indeed, the specter of the unwashed masses heading to the polls come November loomed explicitly in the background of the debate. **Dean Rindy**, a political consultant who recently worked on Place 3 Council Member Kathie Tovo's campaign, circulated a letter to council stating, among other concerns, that: "The argument has been made that November will be more 'democratic' because more people will be voting. It would be truer to say that more uninformed people will vote, though this would not be the voters' fault. It would be the fault of combining too many elections .... As a practical matter, it will be impossible for voters who follow the Presidential or state campaigns to become adequately informed about city issues during the national election season. ... Real democracy depends on informed citizens who have a chance to educate themselves."

Proponents of keeping the vote in May also argued that a change would violate the spirit of the City Charter, a document Tovo noted she had recently "sworn an oath to support" - although SB 100 expressly permits local officials to move the election date regardless of charter provisions. Council Member Sheryl Cole echoed Tovo, arguing that any such change should be placed before local voters. But Bill Spelman plowed ahead with the uninformed voter issue, arguing that "by shoehorning ourselves" in November into lowinformation voters' lives - which are seemingly all-consumed with getting kids to soccer practice - "I don't think we're doing them any favors."

Leffingwell countered simply that the city would be "paying more money to have fewer voters" in May elections, adding, "That just doesn't seem right." Martinez made the most impassioned case for a shift, calling it disheartening to hear "terminology that was used during the debates of the 15th and 19th Amendments to give women and African-Americans the right to vote, things like 'uninformed.' Things like, 'They don't know what they will be deciding upon.' That is exactly what was said when African-Americans wanted to vote; that is exactly what was said when women fought for the right to vote. And here we are in 2011 in Austin, Texas, using those same argu-

ments?" He also noted that "uninformed" voters had in fact pre-

viously voted in November on charter amendments and bond projects.

In the end, the votes to make the change weren't there. Laura Morrison's substitute motion - to proceed with a May election carried 4-3, with Morrison, Tovo, Spelman, and Cole voting ave, and Leffingwell, Martinez, and

Chris Riley voting nay. Since the May date couldn't muster a 5-2 majority, it passed on first reading only, requiring two more votes to be codified - although it seems unlikely minds will change much before council's next meeting in October.

Spelman elaborated afterward: "My concern is, if we bundle those two [local and national elections] together, even if the local government stuff and the school district are at the top of the ballot, a lot of people are just going to page through the top of the ballot to get to the good stuff. They'll vote for Obama, or whoever the Republicans put up, and partisan stuff - that's what's been taking up all their time and their thought for the last few months - and I don't think they'll vote for local stuff."

Similarly, Cole reiterated that any change should occur in a broader framework of revision. "We have bonds coming up ... we just set up the Charter Revision Committee, talking about the length of our terms, the city attorney reporting to City Council. All of this is gonna be on the ballot - talk about potential voter confusion!"

Returning to that spate of ballot issues, Cole called to send the question to voters this November - with the last charter election having occurred more than two years ago, another charter revision is now possible – although there's a good question as to whether there's sufficient time to arrange it.

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## **Fun With Animals**

#### **ACTIVISTS PREVENT SHELTER TRANSFER DURING WILDFIRES**

Earlier this month, as wildfires began to rage across Central Texas and local animal rescue groups searched frantically for homes for displaced pets, Town Lake Animal Center Director Abigail Smith received an offer from the Houston SPCA to accept from Austin as many as 60 animals. TLAC wasn't lacking for space immediately, but Smith accepted HSPCA's offer as a "good will gesture from a sister city and a proactive measure in anticipation of what strain the days ahead could put on our resources." Smith and HSPCA President Patricia Mercer agreed that Houston would keep the animals for no more than 10 days. Any animals not placed in homes by that time would be returned to TLAC.

A day later, Sept. 6, at about 3:30pm, a transport vehicle arrived from Houston. Around that time, word of the transfer started to make its way around the Austin animal-welfare community - thanks in large part to Facebook messages from "no-kill" advocate FixAustin.org asking readers to "head down to TLAC to protest the transfer." Soon after, the transport vehicle left TLAC for Houston with 16 cats and three dogs in crates. Around 5pm, however, the transport vehicle suddenly turned around and headed back to TLAC, where the threeperson HSPCA crew unloaded the animals and passed them off to volunteers from local rescue group Austin Pets Alive!.

That much of the story everybody agrees on. Then things get a little murky.


First of all, there's the reason for the mess: The Houston SPCA is not a no-kill shelter. Exact statistics are hard to come by because the group isn't required to provide them, but some reports put Houston's save rate as low as 49%. Officially, the shelter claims a live-release rate of 60% still 35 percentage points below Austin's Herculean August numbers. For animal welfare activists who have spent years trying to make Austin no-kill, the idea that we would send our animals to what, to them, is essentially an abattoir, is tantamount to betrayal, even mass murder. Add the fact that HSPCA euthanizes all pit bulls that enter its shelter, and you've got a recipe for a very cranky Austin activist population.

But HSPCA representatives insist that their policy does not include euthanizing non-pit animals for lack of space; moreover, Smith says she only agreed to the transfer on the condition that no Houston animals would be euthanized to make space for the Austin transfers (and that no pits would be in the group that made the trip).

Apparently that wasn't enough. According to an internal HSPCA incident statement obtained by the Chronicle, HSPCA decided to stop the bus and return the animals to Austin because its staff had been abused, threatened, and mistreated by Austin animal welfare advocates from the moment they arrived at TLAC, and that abuse continued via "vicious social media attacks" even as the bus proceeded east down Highway 290.

In the statement, one of the members of the three-person team writes that they encountered TLAC volunteers displaying "aggressive behavior," including "cursing and [verbal] snapping," and that the HSPCA staffer "sensed a growing tension about the situation and towards myself." While leaving from the city, the driver was informed by authorities at HSPCA that "someone was reportedly tailing the bus" and that HSPCA's Facebook page was being inundated by hostile, cursing comments (since deleted); soon after, the crew was instructed to drive back to TLAC and return the animals. After they arrived they were "blocked in by about 7 vehicles and about 8-10 individuals."

That's the HSPCA side of the story. APA! insists that there was no protest and that APA! volunteers took action to transport the animals only after the bus had returned. In any case, FixAustin.org's Ryan Clinton argues, the most important outcome is that



those 19 animals didn't have to go to a "high-kill shelter" that only volunteered to take animals from Austin as a "corrupt fundraising ploy."

"HSPCA's only justification for volunteering to take in animals ... is wanting to raise money," Clinton told the Chronicle. "No one yet has given me adequate justification for moving those animals to Houston."

For him, the issue boils down to partnering only with shelters and groups that share Austin's values. "In case of emergency, we would want to work with a shelter that is transparent in their numbers and has no breed-discrimination policies." he said.

As for the reported disturbance at TLAC his group's posts may have been responsible for, Clinton says he's heard nothing about it. He calls the shelter's bus-trailing accusations paranoid and also believes it was TLAC, not HSPCA, that made the decision to return to Austin. "If HSPCA made the decision to turn it around," said Clinton, "it's because they knew we would start asking questions publicly about their kill rate and their breed-discrimination policies."

Whatever the specific events of Sept. 6, the fallout from the incident has been significant. Mercer said she would think twice before "ever sending resources to Austin again," and Smith - who was celebrated only a few months ago for making no-kill a reality - has come under fire for even considering HSPCA's offer. One APA! volunteer, Gina Hush, speaking at a recent Animal Advisory Commission meeting, called for an investigation into the incident and demanded an apology from Smith. On Facebook and other social media sites, commenters were even less forgiving, doubting Smith's compassion, questioning her dedication to the "ethic of No-Kill," and even calling for her termination.

Smith will only say that she made a decision she believed was in the best interest of the community in the face of an enormous natural catastrophe. "We were responding in a disaster situation to an unprecedented situation," she said, "and what we take from that is how we can be better prepared next time."

#### Library Plans Evolved With the Cyber-Times



Plans for the new central library were drawn up with an emphasis on evolving technologies.

City Council last week got an initial glimpse at plans for the city's new central library in a presentation focused on building uses and schematics. The presentation, accompanied by preliminary drawings, offered plenty of hard numbers: 200,000 square feet, six stories, 200 parking spaces, and three entrances to the building's Cesar Chavez location abutting the Seaholm redevelopment, just off the newly built Lance Armstrong Bikeway and a trail along Shoal Creek. And don't forget the numbers on the price tag: Primarily funded by \$90 million in bond money voters approved in 2006, the total expense is expected to come in closer to \$120 million.

The presentation also included a more conceptual discussion of the amenities the center would provide: an ecofriendly building with a green roof; ample natural lighting; rainwater harvesting; grand, interconnected staircases; and a bike porch to park two-wheelers. It also includes several nontraditional library amenities, such as a cafe and two "reading porches" overlooking Shoal Creek and Lady Bird Lake for outdoor reading.

Moreover, presenters **Sid Bowen** (with design company Shepley Bulfinch) and David Lake (with the Lake|Flato Architects firm) and Assistant City Manager Bert Lumbreras sought to emphasize the building's technologically sustainable bona fides - accentuating and embracing evolving technology including e-book lending, ample space for electronics to plug in, and expanded computer terminals.

"We had come to the table basically with a proposition that this should be the best day-lit library in the United States inherently sustainable," said Bowen. "But what's really important in terms of sustainability isn't so much LEED points but future-proofing. In 2007, the Kindle was introduced; in 2010, the iPad was introduced. The whole character of the way information is being delivered is changing more rapidly than we can imagine."

Library details will receive further vetting Oct. 20, when an item to proceed with additional planning for the facility is scheduled to come before council. After that, groundbreaking and construction are scheduled to start in summer 2013, with an opening planned for fall 2015. - Wells Dunbar

## **How Green Is Our Austin?**

After years of lagging behind on its 2007 vow to blaze a national path to **climate protection**, the city of Austin is putting its money where its mouth is and fulfilling a mission to move all city-owned facilities to renewable energy by 2012. With the start of the new budget cycle on Saturday, Oct. 1, municipal departments will begin purchasing 100% of their electricity through Austin Energy's **GreenChoice** program. That's quite a leap from last year – or last week, for that matter – when the municipality was buying less than 20% of its power from renewables.

The changeover transfers about 300 city accounts – roughly 280 million kilowatthours annually – under the GreenChoice umbrella, bringing the overall total to about 360 million kwh annually drawing electricity from renewable energy supplies, according to **Austin Energy** and the city's **Climate Protection Program**. The total GreenChoice endeavor gives Austin the distinction of being the only large city in the U.S. that buys 100% of its electricity from green energy sources.

The city's giant leap forward won't be cheap - about \$6.9 million annually. The price alone may explain why City Council passed the budget measure with zero fanfare, but it nevertheless puts Mayor Lee Leffingwell in good stead for his 2012 reelection bid because he was a prominent co-sponsor of the 2007 resolution introduced by then-Mayor Will Wynn. While council as a whole was silent on its full-tilt transition to renewables, Council member and renewable energy ally Chris Riley did not hesitate to applaud the move when asked to comment. "Austin has carved out a role as a worldwide leader in environmental protection, and reducing our emissions is a critical part of that role," said Riley, who was out of town this week and responded by email. "Full participation in GreenChoice sets a positive standard for our community, and keeps us on track toward achieving a 100 percent reduction of our emissions by 2020."

When the *Chronicle* reviewed the Austin Climate Protection Plan a year ago (see "Slow Burn," Sept. 24, 2010), the program – managed within AE – was struggling to move forward on an ambitious set of initiatives. At the same time, the city was creating a new **Office of Sustainability**, where a climate protection program would presumably be better suited. The program is now a coordinated effort between the two departments, although AE is still the public face of the effort.


"I can't find another city that's 100 percent green, with the exception of Santa Monica, California, and their population is less than 90,000," said Karl Rábago, vice president for distributed energy services at AE. Rábago said he started checking the marketplace about nine months ago to figure out whether it really would be a good deal for the city to move to GreenChoice. At that time, the three wind farm contracts that the city recently approved and which come online in late 2012 were barely a glimmer on AE's radar. The utility first looked to its business customers to see if they would be willing to lock in a 5.7-cent GreenChoice cost on a 10-year contract; for many, the answer was an immediate yes. With that, Rábago started looking at the same deal's potential impact on city departments. "We took [the idea] to the city manager and his team and briefed them on it," he recalled, "and from time to time we'd get questions from them, and we kept it going, and at some point the city manager made the decision to direct his departments to put [GreenChoice] in their budgets. We'll be putting all those [city municipal] customers on a 10-year contract, meaning a major part of running city government will now be under stable pricing for their electricity."

The city's carbon footprint has inched downward ever so slowly since 2007, showing its greatest progress in 2010. If projections hold for 2011 and 2012 under the 100% GreenChoice commitment, Austin truly will be a green star on the national map. (The projections do not include Austin Energy power plants or its FM 812 landfill, the former site of the city's solid waste facility.) AE's next goal is to move the city's fleet to electric vehicles by 2020.

With GreenChoice's current Batch 6 rate of 5.7 cents scheduled to expire Dec. 13, 2014. Rábago will return to council within the next month to secure approval to extend the contracts for new and existing Batch 6 subscribers for both business and residential customers. The renewable energy program will have its biggest impact on the city's major electricity users - Austin Water tops the list because of the power required to move water. On the other end of the scale, the Austin Convention Center will continue reaping the benefits of a cheaper GreenChoice rate as it was one of the early partners of the city's 11-year-old program. "They've been on green power for a while because of the competitive aspect of trying to attract conferences," Rábago said.

He also acknowledged that the city's move to 100% GreenChoice was prodded along by local environmentalists, particularly **Paul Robbins**, who has bird-dogged the program since its inception. "That's Paul's job," Rábago said with a laugh. "We've got this great, long-term base of community support behind this program. I think it's a huge step of responsibility," he went on. "The resolution said we were supposed to be a leader ... and this certainly sets down the marker."

Even Robbins – a frequent City Hall critic – expressed unabashed enthusiasm about the move to renewables. "Austin always talks a good game about how environmental it is, but a lot of it is hype," he said. "Now Austin really is a leader again." – Amy Smith

## **Talking Down the Pipeline**

As the Chronicle went to press Wednesday, the Keystone XL tar sands oil pipeline was under debate at a U.S. State Department hearing in the LBJ School Auditorium on the UT campus (noon-8pm). As the State Department explains the process: "Keystone XL is a proposed 1,700-mile oil pipeline from the U.S.-Canadian border in Montana, through Cushing, Oklahoma, to refineries on the U.S. Gulf Coast. ... The State Department is responsible for reviewing the application for a Presidential Permit for the pipeline to cross the border between Canada and the United States." Public meetings are being held in the six states directly affected by the pipeline, to provide "an opportunity [for citizens] to voice their views on whether granting or denying a Presidential Permit for the pipeline would be in the national interest and to comment on economic, energy security, environmental and safety issues relevant to that determination."

The State Department describes the tar sands as "Western Canadian Sedimentary Basin crude oil" to be transported to refineries in Oklahoma and Texas, with the pipeline also capable of handing U.S. crude; output could be as much as 830,000 barrels per day. Operator TransCanada initially applied for a permit for the project in 2008; if permitted, it could begin operations in 2013. The agency has prepared an environmental impact statement – which concluded that the pipeline will not have a major environmental impact - and says that following hearings in the six states and Washington, D.C., it should be able to make a determination by the end of this year. There is widespread speculation that for both economic and political reasons, the Obama administration will not risk denying the permit.

Opponents have mobilized nationally and internationally against approval of the pipeline, including large demonstrations and celebrity arrests at the White House, and a recent newspaper ad directed toward President Barack Obama and signed by nine Nobel Peace Prize winners (including **Desmond** Tutu and the Dalai Lama) which concludes: "We urge you to say 'no' to the plan proposed by the Canadian-based company TransCanada to build the Keystone XL, and to turn your attention back to supporting renewable sources of energy and clean transportation solutions. This will be your legacy to Americans and the global community: energy that sustains the lives and livelihoods of future generations." The company and pipeline supporters insist that the pipeline is safe and economically necessary and that it will create thousands of U.S. jobs.

Pipeline opponents have focused primarily on the potential for tar sands exploitation to

accelerate global warming, predicting that adding tar sands in bulk to our energy mix will mean (in the words of NASA climatologist James Hansen) "game over" for climate change. Tar sands produce a particularly dirty oil, extracted from "a soil mixture that contains 10% of a tar-like substance called bitumen that can be converted to oil," which would then be diluted and transported through the pipeline under high pressure to refineries in Oklahoma and Texas. Not only is the bitumen a dirty form of hydrocarbons, says the Sierra Club, "tar sands mining also results in the destruction of the Canadian boreal forest, a vital carbon sink and global bird nesting grounds ... [destroying] the Earth's natural ability to capture carbon through the forest." Texas opponents also say the pipeline represents a major potential spill threat to both the Ogallala and Carrizo-Wilcox aquifers.

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
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# **No Indictment in Officer-Involved Shooting**

Austin Police Department Officer Frank Wilson wasn't aware there was anything out of the ordinary about the struggle with Maurice Pierce on Dec. 23, 2010, as he tried to arrest Pierce, who'd fled from a routine traffic stop in a Northwest Austin neighborhood. That was until Wilson felt "something wet" on his neck, Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg said at a press conference last week. At that point something was wrong - very wrong. Wilson was bleeding from a long gash that had severed his carotid artery. During the strug-

gle, police say, Pierce grabbed from Wilson's duty belt a small folding knife, wielding it effectively at Wilson's neck and making the several-inch cut. After realizing he was bleeding. Wilson pulled his firearm and fired a single shot into Pierce's abdomen. As Wilson lav bleeding near the driveway of a house on Campos Drive, Pierce got up and again ran, police and Lehmberg say, but he didn't make it far; his body was found slumped near the front door of a house two doors away. He was dead.

On Sept. 22, Lehmberg announced that a Travis County grand jury had, after hearing three mornings' worth of testimony - including from Pierce's teenage daughter - declined to indict Wilson for killing Pierce.

Why Pierce decided to run when pulled over just before 11pm for rolling through a stop sign not far from his sister's home (where he was living) is a matter of some debate. "Well, he had a habit of doing that," Lehmberg told reporters. True, Pierce had run before - notably during a traffic stop in Collin County several years ago. But according to Pierce's family, Pierce was traumatized after years of harassment

by police who believed he was one of those responsible for the grisly 1991 murder of four teen girls in a North Austin yogurt shop. Pierce,

himself a teen at the time of the crime, was one of four men who in 1999 were arrested and charged with the infamous yogurt shop murders. He spent four years in jail before the charges against him were dismissed for lack of evidence. But that experience - having been accused of and jailed for a crime in which he played no part, he and his family have insisted - scarred Pierce. According to Lehmberg, Pierce's daughter told the grand jury that he didn't want to go back to jail, and he told her shortly before he was shot that he would run

> from the police if pulled over. Indeed, he did just that, fleeing from Wilson across several properties before the fatal encounter on Campos Drive. At one point, Wilson attempted to use his Taser to stop Pierce. Lehmberg said, but it was not effective either Pierce was too far from the weapon for its prongs to attach or his black zippered hoodie was made of material too thick for the prongs to penetrate.

It wasn't malice that led to the slicing of Wilson's throat, Pierce's family members have insisted; they say it was likely a stress reaction. At press time, family members were unavailable for additional comment. Pierce's sister, Reneé Reyna, told us earlier this year that she does not believe

that Pierce would have hurt Wilson on purpose. But Lehmberg said there was no evidence to suggest that Wilson or his partner knew who Pierce was, or of his alleged connection to the yogurt shop murders, at any point during the fatal encounter.

The investigation into the yogurt shop murders is ongoing, Lehmberg said, as investigators continue searching a match to the unknown male DNA found inside the youngest victim, 13-year-old Amy Ayers. (For additional details on the case, see "Yogurt Shop DNA," Sept. 26, 2008.)

#### Death Row

#### A.G. Denies Release of Perry's Clemency Memos

As expected, the Texas Attorney General's Office has denied the Chronicle's public information request seeking all of the clemency memos prepared for review by Gov. Rick Perry. As we wrote in our Sept. 16 feature on Perry's death penalty record, the memos had previously been considered public information, according to then-A.G. John Cornyn, and were released in their entirety. After Greg Abbott was elected attorney general in 2002, the rules changed, and in response to another inquiry from the Chronicle, the documents were now deemed to be privileged attorney-client communications exempt from public disclosure.

So we aren't entirely surprised that Abbott has again rejected our bid to have the clemency memos released. However, his office has also apparently expanded the scope of what is considered "privileged." In our request earlier this year, we also asked for all email communications to and from Perry related to Humberto Leal, a Mexican national executed this summer. According to Abbott's office, these emails also constitute privileged communication and are not subject to release. In the wake of Abbott's decision, dated Sept. 14. Perry's office emailed us to reiterate that it would not be releasing any email communications referring to Leal - apparently including any written to him by constituents or any other individuals outside of state government. #### Morton Murder Case Takes Another Turn


The information in a sealed investigative file provided to a Williamson County court by Travis County prosecutors should take away "any concerns whatsoever" about the innocence of Michael Morton, who is serving a life term for the 1986 slaving of his wife, his attorney said at a Sept. 26 hearing. Morton has maintained he played no role in the bludgeoning death of his wife, Christine, in the couple's Georgetown home. John Raley, who's been handling Morton's case since 2003, argues that evidence kept from his client by Williamson County prosecutors demonstrates Morton's innocence. The evidence includes the content of an interview between Morton's mother-in-law and the Mortons' then 3-year-old son just days after the murder. The son, Eric, was home at the time of the slaying and told his grandmother that his father was not there. Moreover, the defense has found DNA from a known felon mixed with Christine's DNA on a bandana found not far from the couple's home.

Now it appears there's another nail in the coffin for the state's case against Morton, this time provided by Travis County prosecutors in the form of information related to a pending criminal inquiry - but what exactly that information is and who it involves has not been publicly released. According to the Austin American-Statesman's Chuck Lindell, the two-page file "apparently" details the cold case investigation of a 1980s murder. Whatever the content, it was enough for Raley to ask that the state work with the defense on a motion to drop the case and release Morton from prison. Predictably, Williamson County isn't yet ready to concede wrongful conviction because there are still "issues" that need to be resolved, prosecutor Lindsey Roberts told the court. Another hearing is scheduled for Monday, Oct. 3. (For more on the case, see "New Evidence Points to Trouble for WilCo D.A.," Aug. 26.)

#### Last Supper No More

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice will no longer honor special last-meal requests from death row inmates - a new policy prompted by a complaint from state Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, who was perturbed by the last request of Lawrence Brewer, the admitted racist who was among a trio of men responsible for the dragging death of James Byrd Jr. in 1998. Brewer ordered two chicken-fried steaks with gravy and sliced onions; a triple patty cheeseburger; a cheese omelet with ground beef, tomatoes, onions, and jalapeños; a bowl of fried okra with ketchup; a pound of barbecue with bread; fajitas; and Blue Bell ice cream. TDCJ reports that, as has been its practice, Brewer was provided "some" of his request but "not in the quantity requested" and that Brewer didn't eat.

"It is extremely inappropriate to give a person sentenced to death such a privilege" as a choice of last meal, Whitmire wrote in an indignant missive to Brad Livingston, TDCJ's executive director, "one which the perpetrator did not provide to their victim." In a four-sentence reply, Livingston agreed and said that from now on inmates headed to execution will be served the same meal as all other offenders. - J.S.



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
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# AISD: Open Embargo, Find Plan

The latest announcement about the long-awaited **Austin ISD Facility Master Plan** was, among other things, supposed to signal a new era between the district and the local media. Instead, the release triggered a heated exchange between reporters and district staff that threatened to overshadow the plan itself.

On Monday, Sept. 26, new Director of Public Relations and Multicultural Outreach Alex Sánchez met with members of the media at the Carruth Administration Center to brief them on that evening's meeting of the board of trustees. Superintendent Meria Carstarphen was scheduled to present her latest master plan recommendations, beginning with a new structural process: an annual review of each building and how it fits into the district's general academic strategic plan. However, the press briefing soon became fractious when talk turned to the second part of the evening: Carstarphen's presentation of her draft proposals for the 2012-13 school year (see "For Planning Purposes," right). Sánchez told reporters they could have a copy of that draft at 2pm, but only if they signed a binding embargo promising not to release any details until Carstarphen's presentation at 10:40 that night. Cue a tense debate over why the district was demanding such a pledge - and effectively a day's delay in reporting the news - for what looked like a pretty vanilla agenda item.

Such embargoes, while commonly put in place by public relations teams for promotional reasons, are unusual in the public sector, and the *Statesman* had already rejected the district's strings-attached offer. On Sept. 24, the *Statesman*'s editorial "What's in superintendent's secret plan?" reported the embargo request that it had rejected. If Carstarphen were to formally present the plans to the board, the daily argued, they were covered by the **Texas Public Information Act** and so should be available 72 hours before the meeting. The editors wrote, "We remind Carstarphen that she is running a school district, not managing a marketing firm."

Accordingly, Sánchez told reporters, "The *Statesman* ruined it for all of you." However,

the daily was only the first of many local news outlets (including the *Chronicle*) that refused to agree. The consensus among reporters in the room, as well as their editors and general managers back at their offices, was that such an embargo was unnecessary and that signing the form would set a poor precedent. The Monday afternoon briefing ended with a disgruntled press corps aggressively questioning Sánchez and newsroom management weighing in by cell phone. (The *Chronicle* has requested any legal opinions from district general counsel Mel Waxler used to justify the embargo.)

As eventually delivered late Monday, Carstarphen's proposal effectively ends the idea of a 10-year strategic, districtwide facility master plan intended to answer fundamental questions about the overall direction of the district. Board President Mark Williams said that, in Carstarphen's new vision, "the plan is a process" rather than the anticipated "defined, set-in-stone

plan." It's yet another twist in the long push to improve the district's facility planning, which reached a low point this spring when the Facility Master Plan Task Force got hijacked into being all about school closures (see "What the Task Force Wrought," May 27). The board asked Carstarphen to use that report as the basis for an administrative recommendation, moving it back to the strategic level. Now she wants annual facility reviews tying together strategic educational goals and facility conditions. With that change, atlarge trustee Annette LoVoi told her fellow trustees: "'Plan' is a misnomer. That's an unfortunate name for this three-part process, because a 'plan' suggests some immediate decision."

The board is expected to formally adopt the new framework on Nov. 21. In the meantime, Sánchez said, Carstarphen will spend the next two months revising her proposals until she releases her final recommenda-

# FOR PLANNING PURPOSES

On Sept. 26, AISD Superintendent Meria Carstarphen released her draft annual facilities recommendations for the 2012-13 school year. There's nothing drastically new in them: The district has already discussed, in at least the broadest terms, large policy questions like ending the open transfer policies. Teacher and staff union Education Austin is already sounding out the idea of indistrict charters, while the Baker Center and the Carruth Administration Center have been on the real estate market for months. However, this is the first time that Carstarphen has formally said that she's considering all these issues: If she proceeds with all the proposals, this could mean four schools being repurposed and major programmatic changes at another six.

tions for the 2012-13 school year at 6pm on Dec. 9. She expects trustees to vote on it three days later on Dec. 12 – their final regular board meeting of the year – and the process will start again in January for the 2013-14 year.

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# **Attempting to Comply**

With a new name and a new boss, Code Compliance tries to become more 'people-friendly'

No one ever said that Code Compliance officers had to be popular.

They are effectively the cops of zoning ordinances; if they turn up at your door, it is rarely a good sign. So after almost three decades of dealing with noise regulations, off-road parking, high weeds, and building permit violations, Austin's new Code Compliance Director Carl Smart should expect to take the rough with ... the slightly less rough. Prior to Austin, he headed up code compliance and neighborhood conservation departments in Fort Worth, Atlanta, and Gainesville, Fla. Compared to those cities, he said, Austin "has some unique characteristics, like music venues and special events like the [Austin City Limits] Music Festival." On top of that are the unusual pressures of being a major college town and a capital city, "but still, it's neighborhoods; it's people; it's communi-

Austin's Code Compliance Department is essentially a new entity. With 69 staff members and an annual budget of \$10 million, it also has a lot of ground to cover in a city heading quickly toward a million in population. The agency's genesis was in 2001, when the city decided to let Solid Waste

Services (which just changed its name, along with its avowed purpose, to "Austin Resource Recovery") handle all weeds, junk, and litter dumping complaints. In 2005, housing and zoning enforcement was added to that workload, coinciding with the formation of the Code Enforcement Division. Then in 2009, as part of an overhaul of the city's waste management programs, council decided to make Code Enforcement a new agency – the "Code Compliance Department" – reporting directly to the assistant city manager for transportation.

That change in affiliation and title reflected a new direction for handling code violations, but it was not going to be instantaneous. Former Solid Waste Services chief Willie Rhodes became the Code Compliance's first director, and while he was regarded as a safe pair of hands – no one expected either a major office shake-up or a long tenure for Rhodes – his old-school approach to waste management became out of step with modern best practices for trash and recycling, especially with the delays over building a city-owned materials recovery facility. Rhodes was shuffled sideways, pending his retirement earlier this year.

#### The Cycle of Enforcement

However, for an otherwise low-profile agency, Rhodes' tenure certainly gave council a few black eyes and bad headlines: the closure of the Enchanted Forest and the Cathedral of Junk; the recent war over unpermitted additions to houses in the Fairview neighborhood, many of them preceding the current owners; the threat to the East Austin Studio Tour (see "East Austin Studio De-Tour," July 15); and the fight with Coronado Hills homeowner Laura Croteau over whether her nationally certified Wildlife Habitat yard was too unruly (see "From Shrub to Nub," July 8). In each of these cases, the office came under heavy scrutiny and its officers faced severe criticism. That may all be part of the inevitable frictions as Austin shifts from a college town with a laissez-faire attitude to a more modern and more strictly regulated city. All cities undergo that transition; Smart described code enforcement as "a cyclicaltype industry. You have times when elected officials want really strong code enforcement." That was a lesson he learned after Hurricane Andrew devastated Florida in 1992. "Everyone looked at the codes and

said, 'Wait a minute, we need stronger, more strict enforcement of codes.' So Florida changed its code laws. It got stronger and stricter and enhanced its enforcement of those laws, putting in place code enforcement boards, that kind of thing. But after a while, things were going well, and they start to slack off and say: 'We don't need that much code enforcement. Ease up some.'"

For now, Smart is in an unusual position. As the first real head of Code Compliance, he gets to put his signature on its operational structure. At the moment, his inspectors are assigned to specific areas of town. Smart said, "When a problem comes up, a lot of times they already know about that particular property, they've seen it, they've passed it in their day-to-day operations, so they can respond and deal with it effectively." However, in October, he and his senior staff will be meeting to discuss the department's structure, and part of the planning will concern what additional specialist units may be required. That will also require a close examination of relations with other departments, from Planning and Development Review (which issues the permits that Code Compliance enforces) to Parks and Recreation (which clears up foliage when Code Compliance asks it). Said Smart: "It really takes that collaborative effort to get that right. What's the right size of the staffing in order to do that? That's something we have to study."

However, for all the opportunities that Code Compliance affords him, it is an agency that comes with a lot of baggage. In 2010, city auditor Kenneth Mory published a report that was not exactly a clean bill of health. While he applauded the department for how it dealt with neighborhood groups, he found serious problems with core operational procedures. Complaints did not always result in an initial inspection; cases were insufficiently documented, and the reliability of the data was questioned; and, most worryingly, Mory's staff found that "code violation case investigation and resolution practices often differed from CCD policies and procedures" and varied from case to case.

Just before Smart took office in July, Mory published a more positive follow-up. He concluded that the majority of recommendations detailed in the 2010 audit had been fully or substantially implemented. However, three measures were classified as only "underway." Code Compliance still needed to establish a better relationship with the city's Housing Authority. It still needs an integrated case management system. And most importantly, it still needs to establish proper monitoring of its own inspectors to see if they are complying with the department's own rules. It was not just that staff did not always follow the code, but a more general judgement that, as an enforcement-first entity, Code Compliance staff sometimes lacked interpersonal skills.

Put bluntly, they were just not very good with people.

In part, that was why the new department had been named "Code Compliance" rather than "Code Enforcement": to kick-start a culture change. Part of the auditor's 2010 recommendation was that the department create a training program integrating city codes and industry best practices. That system is now in place, and residents should begin to see its impact. "A code enforcement officer has to have two skills," Smart said. "You've gotta know the codes and have the technical skills to handle the codes and what you see out in the field, but you've got to have those interpersonal skills to be able to communicate with all kinds of people."

#### **Hoping for Common Sense**

There remains a very real and continuing concern that Code Compliance too often becomes a weapon in feuds, that residents abuse the anonymous tip system to harass their neighbors. Smart acknowledges that some people have worked out how to game the system – which requires the department

to investigate any complaint, no matter how accurate or substantive - but he says there are checks and balances. The operators at 311 can recognize callers who phone in streams of random complaints, while his officers should be able to recognize when they are being called repeatedly on wild-goose chases to the same address. However, at

least for the present, he stands by anonymous tips rather than moving to a system under which the city requires identification but promises to protect a complainant's anonymity. He said, "You could put in a system where you have to have a name, an address, something like that, to show that you live in the neighborhood or you live in the city of Austin, before we'd take that complaint." However, he added: "I think the answer initially is just that we try to identify those instances of abuse and deal with those individual situations. But if we start to see that that abuse is widespread then we need to change our process."

The core challenge for Smart and his officers was summed up in Mory's 2010 report: "Enforcement officials often face complex problems with a variety of conflicting interests, with resultant pressures from elected officials and community groups to punish violators swiftly, while often receiving complaints that officials are harsh, overzealous, or bureaucratic." A year later, the situation has changed a little. While Mory still praised the department's neighborhood outreach, several council members, including Chris Riley and Mike Martinez, have been increasingly concerned about overzealousness. While there will always be citations and municipal court hearings, Smart wants to move away from "drive-by code enforcement" and instead become more proactive and preventative, with programs like "Stop and Knock." He explained: "It's just that.

Stop your car, knock on the door, talk to somebody." That may require more staff - and Smart said department size will be an inevitable part of the strategic decisions - but it should save court costs and ease neighborhood tensions. Smart said: "A lot of times, by the time you can get a notice issued, the problem's been taken care

of just because now they're aware. 'Oh, I didn't realize that was a code, so now I'll take care of that problem.' So that's good, effective code enforcement."

That perspective may please Mayor Lee Leffingwell, who said he's "hoping for commonsense solutions and an innovative approach to problems." For Smart, the best result may be for everyone to forget that the office was ever called Code Enforcement. He said: "We're here to ensure compliance with the code and make the quality of life better in the neighborhoods for everybody. So as long as we can focus on the goal, everything else is secondary."


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
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I used to think that classical music had a locked atomic structure – you know, like lead. Once one of those bewigged-slash-lion-maned composers of the 18th or 19th century arranged all the notes and rests in a specific combination, the resulting work couldn't be tinkered with. It went into a little box on the Periodic Table of Symphonies or Sonatas or String Quartets and remained there, fixed and immutable.

That, of course, was before I began encountering Austin artists with abilities that ancient alchemists would give their right philosopher's stone for. These are creatives who can take the oh-so-set elements of this music and transmute them into other forms: dance, comedy, visual art. So you think classical can't dance? Stephen Mills will convince you otherwise. The Ballet Austin artistic director won't have a work by Bach just accompany a ballet he's created. As he proved in The Bach Project last year, Mills will pull the DNA right out of Johann Sebastian's music and encode it in movement. Or have compositional magus Graham Reynolds capture the soul of the piece and recast it in a new musical body of his own devising to which Mills will fuse his choreography. Chronicle dance writer Jonelle Seitz reports that Mills is at this classical transformation trick again this week, now with the genius who gave us The Magic Flute. (See "'The Mozart Project," right.)

You figure classical can't be anything but "serious" music? Lyova Rosanoff and Steve Saugey play it for laughs. Literally. The two classically trained musicians take masterworks of the canon and undercut their majestic grandeur by insinuating into them sitcom tunes and commercial jingles. When Cher's "The Way of Love" pops up in the middle of "Variations on a Theme by Paganini," it's like

having dignified old Brahms plop down on a whoopee cushion. Saugey and Rosanoff have been practicing such classical mischief for more than three decades, most of it as musical parodists in residence at Esther's Follies but also in independent projects such as the Austin Flops Orchestra, Beethoven's Birthday, and Forbidden Classics. And they were two of the wits who transported Strauss' Die Fledermaus to Austin, rewriting it as The Bat for Austin Lyric Opera. Their musical shenanigans are of the highest comic order - they're Austin's royals of ridicule. This weekend, the pair are mounting their first project in nine years, an **BY ROBERT** 

Austin Flops Orchestra musicale featuring their lampoons of Liszt ("Catalog of Continental Composers"), Bach ("Brackenridge Concerto"), Handel ("The Jalapeño Chorus"), Brubeck ("Blue Turkey Rondo"), and more. If you'd like to hear classical transmuted into fool's gold, this

is the time. Or perhaps you'd rather see classical music. If so, then Matthew Hinsley is happy to oblige. The executive director of the Austin Classical Guitar Society proved himself adept at recasting the form with the weeklong Austin Goes Classical series of events surrounding the Guitar Foundation of America convention here in 2010. Now he's setting his sights, as it were, on the visual arts with Austin Pictures. The multimedia concert takes the alchemical trick that Modest Mussorgsky used for his celebrated piano suite Pictures at an Exhibition – transforming visual art into music - and flips it. Hinsley invited 11 students from area high schools to create a painting from one of the movements in Mussorgsky's suite. What had been sound

inspired by images is transformed back into images, like a text translated from Russian into English, then back into Russian. The paintings – all of which may be seen at www. austinpictures.org – take you on an amazing journey through mediums and time and culture, from 19th century St. Petersburg to 21st century Austin. But Hinsley doesn't stop there. He's also commissioned composer Joseph Williams II to emulate Mussorgsky and transmute five scenes of our fair city –

The Hill Country, Floating on Lady Bird

Lake, The Dance of the Grackles,

Violet Crown With Cicadas, and Capital City Construction – into music and have the results played by an orchestra of 100 young guitarists from Austin and other locales such as Albuquerque, N.M.; Brownsville, Texas; and Oklahoma City; with the world-class Miró Quartet, under the direction of Austin Symphony Orchestra conductor

Peter Bay. And to cap it off, in tribute to the original inspiration, the event will close with a version of *Pictures at an Exhibition* reworked for *solo guitar* and performed by the incomparable Jorge Caballero. If this evening doesn't make you a believer in classical music's mutability, well ....

**FAIRES** 

Of course, it isn't simply the music that's being transformed. It's those of us who hear it, too. Our sense of the possible – which sometimes stays as locked as lead – opens with golden promise to embrace the unimagined, the unexpected, the new.

# 'The Mozart Project'

#### **MESSING WITH AMADEUS**

It's the start of the ballet season: Dancers are refreshed and eager, new dancers and promotions enliven the veteran ranks, and programming like Ballet Austin's The Mozart Project sets out to prove "damn straight, we're good." The ambitious lineup boasts three new works choreographed by Artistic Director Stephen Mills, all danced to live music. For "Wolftanzt" (the best dance title I've heard in a long time), Austin Chamber Music Center Artistic Director Michelle Schumann and a string quartet from the center will play a version of Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 12 in A Major. "Though the Earth Gives Way" is set to music by Graham Reynolds - who gave a nod to Mozart during the creative process but assures you won't hear any 18th century motifs in the piece - for electrified violin and cello. "Echo Boom" will feature new video and on-the-spot mixed music by Paul D. Miller, aka DJ Spooky That Subliminal Kid.

After having jammed all that into a paragraph, the fabulousness of the program, packed with goodies sure to prove the worth of one's ticket, is clear to me. But beforehand, for a minute, I was skeptical: Was inviting big names to interpret the biggest name in classical music pandering to the most basic knowledge in an effort to cast the widest net possible for an audience? Isn't the best way to appreciate Mozart to listen to his music closely, purely, free from distraction? So I emailed a few of the artists: Why mess with Mozart?

Schumann, Mills, and Reynolds politely set me straight. How can you *not* mess with Mozart? The fact is, we've all heard bits of his work somehow, somewhere – if not in concert, then perhaps in front of the television: Mozart is rampant in commercials, cartoons, and movies. And that is exactly why it should be revisited, reconsidered, jumped off from, they wrote. It's in our DNA, wrote Schumann; part of our "music literacy," noted Mills. Reynolds and Schumann reminded me that, duh, composers don't live in bubbles, so it's impossible not to be influenced by Mozart, and purposefully delving into his mastery results in richness, illumination, a kind of collaboration.

Schumann also reminded me about the sheer joy of association and allusion. Of course! Working with Mozart lets in the greatest number of audience members, inviting all of us to make those connections and build our personal experiences with the composer's genius. Upon stepping out of the theatre into the ever-so-slightly crisp night air, synapses firing, for a few minutes we can have it all: the we and here and now coexisting with fast-fading images of the dancers' movement, musical motifs clarified by choreography, a few remaining droplets of sound, along with all the television commercials and cartoons of childhood – melodies plinked out from the scores of our memories. – Jonelle Seitz

# **Benjamin and Byron's Long-Term Affair**

An émigré author, a bad-boy poet, and an epic trilogy at its end

Lord Byron has inspired many a rock star and writer - not to mention an unctuous performance by Gabriel Byrne in that Kenneth Russell classic *Gothic*, as well as a funky comparison to Elvis Presley by cultural critic Camille Paglia. But for Londonbased Austin-émigré Benjamin Markovits, the aura of this decadent bard/baron is a deep source of personal literary gratitude.

"Byron was more than just a subject for me," says Markovits, who teaches creative

writing at the Royal Holloway, University of London. "He was part of my teenage love of books, and I think a lot of kids go through something important when they start to read seriously for the first time in their lives. Reading teaches you that other people can be as strange and intricate as you seem to yourself."

With the publication of Childish Loves, a bibliophilic meditation in the guise of a historical novel, Markovits has completed an ambitious metafictional trilogy based on the

who slept with his half-sister and died of a fever contracted while defending liberty in Greece.

"It's a novel about the love of books and the importance of books to people's ideas of themselves," says its author, regarding his sixth book.

In *Imposture*, the first of the series (which includes the superb stand-alone A Quiet Adjustment), we are introduced to the mysterious Peter Sullivan, an aging, headphonewearing high school teacher who has written a stack of Byron books that he bequeaths to a fictional Benjamin Markovits. *Childish* Loves returns us to the mysteries of the dead writer by way of three stories that, through their focus on the poet, shed light on Sullivan's secret life.

Though the cumulative effect of the trilogy seems absolutely informed by post-

> modernity, Markovits feels guided by a sense of tradition and an adherence to authenticity: "The Romantics loved playing games with fragments and frames, but for them, it was part of an attempt to make the art seem real. Postmodernism uses the frame to undermine the reality of the picture. I like realism, and one of the things I try to do in Childish Loves is make it seem as real as possible. And that means accounting for who's writing what the reader reads and why. "I don't like told history

sybaritic exploits of the notorious poet in historical fiction, at least in my own. You know, 'London in 1818 was the kind of city ....' I like to write the book as if it were a contemporary novel, just contemporary to a different period," says Markovits, who used to teach high school English and incorporates the pedagogic lifestyle into Childish Loves. "The thought of someone who spends his working career going back year after year to the classic works of literature - Hamlet, Great Expectations, Huck Finn, et cetera - and trying to find new things in them, while every year the kids he teaches change and grow and leave him behind, strikes me as very suggestive."

There is, in Childish Loves, aside from the framed tales of panic and perversity, also a serious criticism of the academic lifestyle.

"A lot of writers teach for the obvious financial reasons, though I think many of them also like getting out of the house. And teaching is basically a flattering occupation: You have smart students who have to listen to what you say. I'm also not one of the writers

who thinks the only thing you can do in a creative writing class is give your best students the number of your agent." Markovits thinks there are things, in creative writing, that can be taught, and "it's been interesting to me as a writer to work out what they are. It's also another part of the act of persuasion that makes you want to write books in the first place: to tell people how you see the world.'

One of the strangest and most affecting treats in Childish Loves involves the fictional Markovits and his dealings with the

Society for the Publication of the Dead, a cabal of grieving literary executors who meet for dinner and try to figure ways to publish the manuscripts of their dead friends and relatives. On the inspiration for this, Markovits says: "I once bought a book in New Orleans called Have Pen, Will Autograph, which was entirely about the weird and mostly awful experiences its author had giving readings and signing books. I've had a few odd experiences myself, which I put together into the Society - it's often the episode I find myself reading at readings."

One gets the feeling that Markovits who, due to geographic jumps that took him from Texas to playing amateur basketball in Germany and teaching in London, admits to feeling "rootless, and always something of an outsider" - finds his true home in literature.

Aside from weaving intricate novels that extend the genre of historical fiction, this father of two may, like his fictional counterpart, be involved in a little posthumous reputation-saving: "Byron tends to get played on film for camp value. People forget what Disraeli said about him: that the striking thing about Byron was his 'pure, unalloyed sagacity.' He was a shrewd, sensible observer and friend, in spite of his vanities. And that part tends to get left out - I hope to show it in my book."



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# EXHIBITIONISM

#### Hamlet

Rollins Theatre at the Long Center, 701 W. Riverside, 474-5664 www.austinshakespeare.org Through Oct. 9 Running time: 3 hr., 20 min.

Admittedly, I think Shakespeare is best when performed without much to detract from all those words, words. But I was pleasantly surprised by how well the intricate and impressive design of Austin Shakespeare's Hamlet works to complement both the text and director Ann Ciccolella's well-cast actors. The production elements coalesce to create what lighting co-designer Patrick W. Anthony calls a "mood ring" effect, changing to reflect the play's emotional pendulum.

Anthony, along with lighting powerhouse Jason Amato, uses colored lights to enhance Kevin Beltz's striking set, creating visual effects on two red floor-to-ceiling canvas banners flanking the stage. Particularly arresting

is the violent backlighting that heightens the drama of the Claudius prayer scene. Lighting also cleverly reduces scene changes. Though chairs are used occasionally to supplement Beltz's basic set-piece - a large ramp at center stage - it is lighting, not bulky sets, that distinguishes each scene. My favorite was the menacing yet almost imperceptible suggestion of a flickering fire in a secluded room where Claudius and Laertes plot Hamlet's murder. Also of note are Pamela Fletcher Friday's polished and elegant 19th century period costumes. Sound is the only tenuous design: John Vander Gheynst's ambitious music, though it creates suspense in the tense opening scene, often lengthens transitions in the already long production.

As elaborate as the show's design is, it doesn't overshadow the spirited actors, who are held together by the boyish and mesmerizing urgency of Helen Merino, an Austin Shakespeare veteran reprising the role of Hamlet she played a decade ago.



Merino savors every word - and she says a lot of them - but even when she is most pensive, her performance never lags; she conveys Hamlet's profound interior conflict

with startling clarity and boundless energy, especially the bookish prince's introspective reluctance to enact his revenge on King Claudius, played by a brusque Ray Schultz. And though Hamlet resents the betrayals of Gertrude and Ophelia, Merino oscillates with ease between rage and longing love, aided by dynamic chemistry with both Hamlet's mother, played delicately by Kate Shaw, and his ex-girlfriend, played with great pathos by powerful newcomer Chelsea Duvall. A highlight is the nunnery scene, in which Hamlet furiously throws sobbing Ophelia to the ground and then kneels to embrace her in a regretful, tender caress. Though not all of the supporting cast members reach the emotional intensity of these actors, Scott Shipman (Polonius) and Steve Cruz (Rosencrantz, Bernardo, Captain) give standout performances.

With complicated technical elements, including an unusual take on the ghost (which I won't spoil here), this production has the potential to come off like the effusive Polonius, to whom Gertrude sighs, "More matter with less art." But Austin Shakespeare has fused matter and art to create a wellbalanced Hamlet that, despite its length, is worth watching. - Jillian Owens

'Mike Egan: The Death of 1977' Yard Dog, 1510 S. Congress, 912-1613

Come on, baby, don't fear the reaper. Death comes for all of us eventually, so it's just one more shared human experience that we can revel in until ... ah, well, until we die.

Painter Mike Egan might realize that more deeply than most people, as the Pittsburgh native is a former funeral director and embalmer - which would help explain his fascination with skulls. He paints them, you see. He doesn't paint on skulls, mind you, he renders simple graphic images of skulls, in acrylic paint on wood, and accompanies them with similarly simple symbols of life and death and the myriad mysteries pertaining thereto.

"Simultaneously creepy and beautiful," states the exhibit description at Yard Dog, and there's no arguing that. Egan's paintings with their rich yet muted colors could answer the question: What if the Reverend Howard Finster had been 1) obsessed with the arcana of life's termination and 2) strictly coached by Shepard Fairey? These stunning squares of various sizes (14 inches by 14 inches, 16 by 16, 24 by 24, and more) could be enlargements of mid-century German postage stamps used by mortuaries to send out funeral announcements, a death-cult church's stained glass windows made ligneous by some weird alchemy, pictographic Burma-Shave signs on the road to heaven or hell.

This Egan show's got the spotlight right now, but it fits perfectly, comfortably part of the whole, in the well-stocked South Congress hall of American folk art treasure that is Yard Dog. To which emporium we'd recommend a visit soon, because life, as they say, is short, while art remains as long as ever. You know, like the wind and the sun and the rain. - Wayne Alan Brenner

#### Samuel Barber: American Romantic St. Martin's Evangelical Lutheran Church, 606 W. 15th Sept. 23

Beginning a concert with the end of the world may sound like a downer, but when the apocalypse is signaled by Samuel Barber, it's anything but. The pronouncement that the world "will flame out" - delivered two lines into the first work on Conspirare's program of Barber's choral music - rang from the ensemble's three dozen singers with the righteous force of an Old Testament prophet. and its gathering volume and insistence thrilled. If it was the end of the world as we know it, I felt fine.

This talk of doomsday, though, is just to establish, as the title says, "God's Grandeur," and ultimately, the song abandons it in favor of praising nature and the ministrations of the Holy Ghost – a tonal shift from Jeremiah to psalmist, with a gentility matching the narrator's expression of admiration. By song's end, the chorus' sensitive rendition hadn't erased the opening's grave power, but it had tempered and informed it with warmth and grace.


So it was throughout the program. The material selected by Artistic Director Craig Hella Johnson abounded in darkness - the bleak blackness of a midwinter night, the despair of lost love, and death, death, death - yet there was little gloom. In his compositions, Barber does go gentle into that good night. With passages that are almost whispered, that move at the pace of deep consideration, that resolve in heartbreakingly rich harmonies, the composer softens the edge of loss. Within his expressions of grief lie a profound acceptance of endings that infuse

sorrow with great beauty - as in "The Virgin Martyrs," a piece for a female chorus eulogizing female saints. Singing it, Conspirare's women seemed to be hovering above our heads in the sanctuary. They landed only upon reaching the final word, "love," which they held in a long, moving fade to silence.

The grim reaper may have received the most tribute in the concert, but life was not ignored. "Mary Hynes" jubilantly praised a woman's beauty, and "The Coolin (The Fair Haired One)" cast a romantic liaison on a hillside as a dreamy repose, with Conspirare's voices like a sigh. The program's second half mostly featured The Lovers, a choral setting of poems by Pablo Neruda originally written for a large chorus and orchestra but newly and most impressively - revised into a chamber version by regular Conspirare collaborator Robert Kyr (A Time for Life, Songs of the Soul). From its ardent description of the feminine form to a languid depiction of a summer's day, the work throbs with sensuality, and Johnson guided his singers through it with a heat and vigor that was hypnotic. The song cycle loosely tracks a romance from passion's first flames to the ashes after it fades, with a solo baritone voicing one of the lovers. David Farwig filled that role with fire, most notably in "Tonight I Can Write," where his attempt to bleed himself of his lost love seethed with tortured feeling.

Conspirare will record this material for its next CD. As its exquisite voices are wonderfully well-suited to the lushness and beauty of this "American romantic," that's good news for the ensemble's fans. But given the care they showed toward the music in this program, that's also good news for Barber.

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
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#### PERRY/FRIEDMAN 2012?

















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
















# FOOD Cuban Joints

#### Mi Kfecito 8309 Research, 501-6698 Monday-Saturday, 8am-8pm

How often can you get great Cuban food and a perm and a pedi under the same roof? On the north access road of Research Boulevard between Top Cash Pawn and Twin Liquors, in a little strip mall between Jamestown Drive and Clearfield Drive, your hair salon and Cuban food dreams come true. The menu is large and very complete, covering many of the Cuban bases, and the 55-seat dining room looks nicer than expected. If this place were Downtown instead of where it is (not that there's anything wrong with its location), it would be packed.

We started with a pork empanada (\$2.55) that had a sweet, crispy exterior and an interior loaded with lechón and ham. Tostones (\$1.95) were twice-fried crisp and tasty, while the yucca con mojo (\$3.45) is definitely better at Cuban Sandwich Cafe; ours here was undercooked, and the sauce was lackluster. But the **Cubano** sandwich here (\$6.99) is one of Austin's best sandwich offerings: huge, on crispy golden bread, loaded with a layer of lechón, with oozing cheese, ham, and pickles. Every bite brings a smile. Perhaps even better is the Ropa Vieja sandwich (\$4.99), loaded with succulent shredded braised beef in a rich, oniony tomato sauce. Some of the better-tasting "old clothes" I've eaten, and perfect on a grilled sandwich.

Mi Kfecito does a lunch special daily for \$7.45, and it includes a big bowl of soup, meat, two sides, and a big slab of cake. I definitely have my eye on other dishes to order in the future: oxtail stew, *bacalao* Vizcaina, Cuban fried chicken, and shredded chicken in Cuban sauce. Service could have been quicker, but it was definitely worth the wait.



#### Cuban Sandwich Cafe 1804 Briarcliff, 501-6651 Monday-Saturday, 10am-7pm; Sunday, 11am-4pm

Owner **Enrique Reyes** came to the U.S. from Cuba at the age of 6, and after many years of learning his craft from a Miami uncle, he migrated to Austin. His charming but small bakery-cafe is located on the northeast edge of the Berkman-Briarcliff intersection, right behind Harris Elementary. The bakery case holds a nice selection of crispy treats; a cheese Danish was buttery and flaky, while the pineapple empanada had a flaky, sweet exterior and a rich pineapple filling. There are some nods to the neighborhood on the menu, but the bulk of the menu is based on Cuban sandwiches.

We started with the **Cubano** (\$5.50), a large sandwich on house-made bread, grilled and pressed on the *plancha* and filled with ham, Swiss cheese, *lechón*, mayo, mustard, and pickles. This is the classic South Florida *mixto* treat that could only be better with more lechón added. The real stars of the menu are the *pan con lechón* (pork sandwich, \$4.75) and the amazing **EI Cubanito burger** (\$6.50). The sandwich is on traditional Cuban bread, with a thick layer of the cafe's rich, well-seasoned, tender roasted pork – a fantastic sandwich improved only by the addition of garlicky mojo sauce. The



Cubanito burger is massive, with burger patty, ham, two cheeses, lechón, and bacon sitting atop the standard vegetables, easily in the Top 10 of Austin burgers.

Reyes runs specials daily, which look very tempting. We saw an *arroz mariscos* (\$9.50), a huge seafood mound on a platter of rice; a *fried sea bass filet* (\$7.50) that covered a huge platter; and *arroz con pollo* and *palomilla* (each \$7.50). Reyes' great little joint is now on our regular dining list, and as Ricky Ricardo might say, we "have some 'splorin' to do."

Last week marked some sudden changes in the local restaurant scene with three high-profile restaurants closing. The Sixth Street entertainment district's first fern bar, the Paradise Cafe (401 E. Sixth), closed after 30 years of weathering changes in a constantly evolving neighborhood. Farther west, upscale restaurant and lounge the **Belmont** (305 W. Sixth) closed abruptly, causing local event planners to scramble to relocate scheduled events. And in West Austin, the architecturally unique pan-Latin eatery El Arbol (3411 Glenview) also shuttered in the middle of the week with no advance notice. Word on the street is that interested parties were already looking at all three properties by week's end. We'll keep you posted when or if new operators set up shop in any of the three buildings.

And speaking of Sixth Street, a well-established business in that neighborhood has something new and different to offer. After years of serving up hot slices of pizza to latenight bar patrons out of a storefront, **Roppolo's Pizzeria** owner Marc Roppolo has expanded his operation to include the threestory St. Charles House (316 E. Sixth). Roppolo's now includes a comfortable patio and deck, plus air-conditioned indoor seating for 140 and flat-screen TVs in every room. Patrons can order pizza, calzones, pasta, and salads with a glass of wine or a cold beer and relax in the newly renovated space.

Kudos to **Austin Slow Burn** owners **Jill** and **Kevin Lewis**, who recently returned from the annual Houston Hot Sauce Festival with the Best in Show trophy for the second year in a row. The prestigious trophy is awarded to the contestant with wins in the most categories, and Austin Slow Burn swept the competition with three first-place and two second-place ribbons. Look for their award-winning products at Central Market, Whole Foods Market, Royal Blue Grocery, Thom's Market, the Meat House, the Market at Steiner Ranch, Paleface Grocery, Brodie Park Market, and select H-E-Bs.

If you're looking for a way to eat a healthier plant-based diet on a budget but don't know where to start, Austin's newest meal delivery service wants to come to your rescue. Chef Veronica Chapa of **Veggytopia** (www.veggytopia. com) offers a week's worth of chef-prepared, vegan meals for just under \$100. The new company provides organic and gluten-free options as well and charges no delivery fees.

Congratulations to **Marla Camp** and **Terry Thompson-Anderson** on the success of the first **Edible Texas Wine & Food Match** competition (won by Austin chef David Garrido), which generated a \$10,000 donation to the Texas Center for Wine and Culinary Arts in Fredericksburg. Well done, ladies.

# Wine of the Week

#### Arneis, the Almost Extinct Italian White

Traditionally, Arneis had a supporting role used solely to soften the tough red Nebbiolo wines of Piedmont. The grape was almost extinct until the 1980s, when a few winemakers started to make the wine to sell locally. Because it has very low acidity, it takes great care to balance its flavors, but the intense peach and floral aromas warrant the effort. Arneis is ideal for Texans who like to sip wine casually as a social lubricant, especially during our nice weather in the fall and spring. Pour it at refrigerator temperature – then, as it slowly warms in the glass, the aromas become more and more concentrated. Arneis is ideal with a lightly sauced white fish.

**Ceretto's Blange** (\$17-18) is one of the best versions, and it's also easy to come by. If you want to try Arneis at its best, look for **Bruno Giacosa**'s version (\$35). The **Jacuzzi** family (yes, *that* Jacuzzi family) also makes a nice version in California that runs about \$14. All three wines can be found at or ordered from local fine wine shops.

When **Mike Baldwin** and **Jeffrey Lynd** moved to Austin nearly a decade ago, they couldn't help but notice that Austin, at that time, didn't have something that they'd grown used to in the Bay Area: restaurants with good food that served a wide variety of locally brewed beers. "There were a lot of places that had great wine lists, but the beers were mostly national and international brands, and most restaurants served bottled beer," recalls Baldwin. So he and Lynd opened Zax to fill the gap, bringing in as many crafted draft beers as they could find. "I like to think we were pioneers in Austin in that regard," says Baldwin. "When we started,



I think the only two local brewers were **Live Oak Brewery** and **Real Ale**, out of Blanco. There has been such a tremendous growth in craft brewing since that time. ... There is a whole lot more to choose from these days!"

At present, Zax offers 20 varieties of beer on draft, roughly half of which are regional. The stock rotates with each brewery's seasonal offerings, and they change so often that the name of each brew is written above each cask on an erasable blackboard. "Every Wednesday is Pint Night," explains Baldwin. "A different brewery is featured each week, and when you buy a pint, you get to keep the signature glass it came in. Needless to say, it's our most popular happy hour."

While local brewing is so central to Zax's concept, the casks and full bar do not dominate the dining room; instead, they are tastefully located in the east side of the space, behind a slight partition. When you're in the dining room, you feel like you are in a restaurant, not a bar. The space is airy, with glowing yellow walls and natural light pouring in from banks of old-fashioned, many-paned windows. On the north side of the dining room, the greenery of the patio garden is visible, lending the room a far more restful air than one generally enjoys close to Downtown. It is a room particularly suited to brunch.

The brunch menu at Zax lives up to its setting. It is comprehensive, offering eggs Benedict, eggs Florentine, Cajun eggs with andouille sausage, migas, huevos rancheros, house-made corned beef hash and eggs, and the house specialty, Zax Eggs (\$14). consisting of perfectly poached eggs resting on freshly baked crab cakes and covered with hollandaise sauce. Served with your choice of crisp potatoes, black beans, sliced tomatoes, or cheese grits, and your choice of toast, the egg dishes are cheerfully decadent. Banana bread French toast, regular French toast, and omelettes are also offered on the menu, as well as burgers, quesadillas, appetizers, salads, soups, pizza, pasta, and sandwiches.



The lunch and dinner menus are just as long and varied as the brunch menu. It seems as though every dish known to be popular with Americans is offered, which is initially a little off-putting. Most restaurants with menus this comprehensive fail at executing them. Remarkably, Zax succeeds. Over the course of several visits during both busy and slack times, the food was always well-made and reliably executed. The onion rings (\$4) are made the French way, with thinly sliced, hand-breaded onions, just as they were made at Delmonico's at the turn off the century. The individual pizzas (\$9) are crisp and thin-crusted, topped with excellent cheese and your choice of freshly prepared toppings; the  $\textbf{shrimp and roasted-corn quesadillas} \ (\$10)$ are large discs filled with just the right amount of perfectly fresh shrimp, cheese, and corn. With so many different menu items available, Zax seems like a no-brainer for dining out with family, colleagues, or any other group whose preferences are likely to be all over the map.

Extra effort is put into the dinner entrées, many of which echo chef Lynd's partially French heritage. Nearly half of the entrées are seafood, such as seared scallops meunière (\$23) and Mediterranean tilapia (\$16), and the rest range from steak au poivre and frites (\$23) to pan-seared duck breast (\$20). The entrées are available at 6pm after several hours of intense preparation. "We make all our sides fresh every day," says Baldwin - "the mashed potatoes, the goat-cheesepistachio polenta, the rum mashed sweet potatoes, the mushroom risotto, and of course the vegetables." The sesame-crusted tuna (\$20), served with sweet ginger soy sauce and wasabi mashed potatoes, was fork-tender and deep pink, slightly crisp on the outside and perfectly satisfying.

On Thursday, Oct. 13, from 6 to 10pm, Zax will celebrate **Oktoberfest** with a live polka band, locally made bratwurst from Smoky Denmark, and a selection of specially brewed Oktoberfest beer from Live Oak Brewing Company, Saint Arnold Brewing, and Germany.






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

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

## Film History, With a Fresher Date Than Usual

#### **AUSTIN CINEMATHEQUE OPENS SEASON WITH 'UNCLE BOONMEE'**

The Austin Cinematheque showcases great classic films on the University of Texas at Austin campus. Surprisingly, this student collective is one of few groups dedicated these days to such an endeavor at UT, even though not all that long ago, auditoriums across campus flickered nightly with the seductive glow of great films from the past. The advent of videotape and DVD, cutbacks in student-activity allocations, and the failure to regard film history as an essential part of a well-rounded liberal arts education have virtually eliminated public screenings of film classics on the UT campus. However, since 2005, the Austin Cinematheque has brought films to the Texas Union, ranging from foreign classics such as François Truffaut's The 400 Blows and Bernardo Bertolucci's The Conformist to homegrown gems such as Jim Jarmusch's Stranger Than Paradise and Woody Allen's Zelig.

The group kicks off the 2011 fall season with something new - a contemporary film instead of a relic from the past. Uncle Boonmee Who Can Recall His Past Lives by Thailand's Apichatpong Weerasethakul is the group's first film premiere. The 2010 film, which won the Cannes Film Festival's Palme d'Or (the top prize),

completely bypassed Austin during its very limited theatrical run. A strange, mystifying, and often oblique movie, Uncle Boonmee easily blends naturalism and surrealism, the

physical and spiritual worlds, the corporality of the body and the transmigration of souls. Uncle Boonmee, who is dying of kidney cancer, is visited by his sister-in-law when ghosts from the past begin to appear. His deceased wife takes on a traditionally supernatural appearance, while their long-lost son reappears in the guise of a man-sized monkey with red, glowing eyes. The living and the dead converse freely, and an amorous catfish joins in a story about a princess in what may have been one of Boonmee's past lives. The film is both bizarre and prosaic, an experience to which one much submit rather than pick apart. The programming choice bodes well for a terrific season at the Austin Cinematheque, which has already announced its Nov. 14 film - F.W. Murnau's silent classic The Last Laugh, with live accompaniment by the Weird Weeds.

# In Print

How To Do Things With Videogames by Ian Bogost University of Minnesota Press. 192 pp., \$18.95

The cover of lan Bogost's latest book shows an average urban street corner, except the pedestrians' heads have



been replaced with brightly colored shapes and pixelated icons. To Bogost, average people are gamers because video games have become so prevalent as to be unavoidable. His 2007 book, Persuasive Games: The Expressive Power of Videogames, is widely considered gospel for its exploration of the tools available to game developers and how they can be used to do more than just entertain. Compared with the daunting informational meal of Persuasive Games, his recent release, How To Do Things With Videogames, is just a snack: snappy, but not seminal.

The bite-sized chapters each serve the introduction's main goal of offering examples of how "videogames have seeped out of our computers and become enmeshed in our lives." What Bogost does best is make interesting connections seem obvious without getting bogged down in tech jargon. Over the course of a handful of pages, he can explain why virtual worlds are one of the few places that reward travel for travel's sake, or why abstract violence is more damaging to the psyche than hyperrealistic war games. The most impressive feat is perhaps his ability to tackle the games-as-art debate, avoiding the usual pitfalls and deftly hammering his point home without whining, something many writers have failed to do.

With titles like "Titillation," "Promotion," "Branding," and "Exercise," each chapter brings to light the effect games have on specific areas of our lives, often without our notice. Some portions don't quite reach their perceived destination, but more often than not, chapters begin with distant points that Bogost manages to persuasively and clearly connect. Most significantly, Bogost makes good on his mission statement: to introduce a section of our culture and either highlight the role of video games in that area or, more impressively, makes those connections appear before the reader's eyes like magic.

After Bogost has taken the reader to the often forgotten or unseen corners of the gaming world and proven the medium's undeniable presence (although sometimes questionable worth) in those nooks, he predicts that with ubiquity comes a loss of uniqueness. He argues convincingly that the era of "gamers" as a discernible subculture is reaching its expiration date and that day is something to look forward to. How To Do Things With Videogames gets us there a little faster.





# The Hamburg Sound

Hamburg, Germany, is famously credited for the **Beatles**' "baptism by fire," a double entendre for the sexual liberation afforded by the seedy **Reeperbahn** and the **Fab Four**'s extensive club dates in the region between 1960 and 1962, which included 92 consecutive nights at the Top Ten Club. Last weekend, the harbor city hosted the sixth annual **Reeperbahn Festival**, a music conference boasting more than 200 acts across three days, with an emphasis on potential over star power. The event's the European version of **South by Southwest** – except set in the Red Light District – complete with a **Flatstock** poster convention, industry panels, and showcases taking place everywhere from the tourist boat **Frau Hedi** to the district's namesake church, **Saint Pauli**. Here are five acts OTR found worth writing home about.

#### **EMA**

"Destruction happens," remarked **Erika M. Anderson** after ripping a guitar string. "This city understands that." That's an understatement for both parties. As Oakland, Calif.'s **EMA**, the former **Gowns** guitarist carved out noise-pop confessionals as immediate and distressed as **PJ Harvey**'s 4-Track Demos, peaking with startling covers of the **Violent Femmes**' "Add It Up" and **Gowns**' provocative mantra "Cherylee."

#### **APPARAT**

Berlin composer **Sascha Ring**'s latest electronic export as **Apparat** for Mute Records, *The Devil's Walk*, explores the moody digitalization of **Thom Yorke**'s *The Eraser* through the lens of **Sigur Rós**' unresolved grandeur. The result's an intricate work, more suspension than release, but the surreal setting made his performance a festimate of the surreal setting made his performance.

val highlight: **Uebel & Gefährlich**, the fourth floor of a massive concrete bunker from World War II.

#### MISS LI

A gypsy rose in the **Tom Waits** mold, Sweden's
Dresden doll **Linda Carlsson**,
aka **Miss Li**, put a cabaret
spin on piano pop that
walked a tightrope between
bawdy and seductive. "Forever
Drunk" and "Arrested," both
from 2011's Beats & Bruises,
countered **Adele**'s midnight
neo-soul.

#### **APPARAT ORGAN QUARTET**

Jóhann Jóhannsson's on the dark side of the Moog. Actually a quintet (four analog organists and a drummer), the Icelanders' lunar oddities layer percolating grooves and vocoder to Krautrock perfection, as efficient as the city's **Miniatur Wunderland** train museum. Think **Black Moth Super Rainbow** suited for a black-tie affair.

#### BRATZE

Imagine if **Ghostland Observatory** cut its teeth on the Reeperbahn instead of Red River. That's the Hamburg duo of **ClickClickDecker** (aka **Kevin Hamann**) and **Der Tante Renate**, an obvious local favorite that shook the Beatles' onetime landing strip **Grosse Freiheit 36** at capacity. Bratze turned out dance punk at its Euro-sleaze extreme, with four-on-the-floor electro house convulsions mashed against jagged guitar fissures and shouted German vocals.



#### Help!

Nakia makes an ideal spokesman for the Health Alliance for Austin Musicians. The blues belter is among the 1,200 working artists who rely on the esteemed nonprofit for low-cost medical and mental health services. "HAAM and the SIMS Foundation really did save my life," says Nakia, who was the first aboard HAAM's dental truck and who rocked HAAM's new watch throughout the live rounds on NBC's *The Voice* (see "Water to Wine," Sept. 9). "You cannot go anywhere else in the world and receive that kind of service just because you play music for a living." Alongside more than 160 local acts, Nakia will be doing his part on Tuesday, Oct. 4,

## **Another One Bites the Dust**

Vulcan Gas Company. Raul's. Liberty Lunch. Add Emo's to the list of Austin's vanguard of vanishing venues. As intimated here last week, both stages of Red River's historic punk anchor were sold on Friday for "seven figures" to Sixth Red River LC, the same company that purchased the corner property currently occupied by El Sol y La Luna. Given the recent unveiling of the \$2 million, 1,700-capacity Emo's East on Riverside Drive, owner Frank Hendrix said the iconic inside room, which he recently called "the heart and soul" of Emo's, was "just not feasible" to operate as a standalone venue, citing bus parking expenses anywhere from \$2,000 to \$4,000 a month. The inside room will close at the end of the year with a series of farewell shows. "In a six-month period, the contract for the sale changed five times," Hendrix told the Chronicle on Monday. "Originally, I had done a lease with these guys to operate the business through April 15, 2012. We were going to do our South by Southwest swan song and move on. Now that swan song will be December."

#### Random Play

Thunder Soul, the acclaimed documentary on Houston's almighty jazz-funk ensemble the **Kashmere Stage Band** (see "Kismet in Kashmere," Screens, March 12, 2010), has been backed by actor **Jamie Foxx** for national distribution, coinciding with **Now-Again Records**' deluxe reissue of the 2006 compilation *Texas Thunder Soul* 1968-1974. Both are celebrated locally with an **Austin Film Society** screening at the **Alamo Drafthouse Village** on Thursday, Sept. 29, at 7pm, followed by a rare reunion performance at **Uncle Billy's Brew & Que** at Lake Travis Friday, Sept. 30.

# The Hatchett Man

#### Booker Charlie Hatchett Jr. mapped Lone Stars far and wide

Agents like Hatchett stood

among the gatekeepers to

the music industry.

A young man approached local booking agent David Cotton's table at a Rotel & the Hot Tomatoes gig in Dallas.

"You're from Austin, right? Do you know Charlie Hatchett?"

Cotton said yes, he did, but how did his inquisitor know him?

"My dad asked about him."

"Who's your father?" inquired Cotton. The young man grinned.

"Don Henley."

For more years than want to be counted, Hatchett Talent Agency has booked acts in and around the Austin area and United States. Charlie Hatchett Jr. was the go-to Austin agent for businesses, events, organizations, and clubs needing musical entertainment. Today, his son runs the agency, but once upon a time, agents like Hatchett ruled, standing among the gatekeepers to the music industry.

#### **Legals and Eagles**

Charlie Hatchett grew up the son of a farmer in Lamesa, outside Lubbock. He was a teenager when Buddy Holly died, but he didn't play music until his freshman year of college, when he picked up his roommate's guitar. By the time he graduated from the University of Texas in 1963, his party band the Chevelles ranked as Austin's group of choice.

If the Chevelles were booked, Hatchett

referred other locals, matching the event's needs to a band's ability to sing Beach Boys harmonies, for example, or employ horns. Once he opened the

Hatchett Talent Agency soon thereafter, he booked acts including the 13th Floor Elevators, Christopher Cross, Bubble Puppy, Eric Johnson, and ZZ Top, plus Texas powerhouse acts of the era like Krackerjack, Gunpoint, Rabbit, and Lynx. The agency mapped clubs not only throughout Texas but also in circuits around the region. Clubs booking HTA clients understood they bought a guaranteed level of competence and professionalism.

It helped that Hatchett graduated with a law degree from UT, and his keen vision drove the Chevelles, who then included Dwight Dow, Tom Van Zandt (yes, distant cousin), and frontman Ernie Gammage, whose attorney father provided a basic contract to book gigs. Hatchett took that contract and, using his schooling, modified it into a document that would become the HTA standard, its basic form still in use today. That's precisely the sort of detail that got the attention of an ambitious Northeast Texas drummer named Don Henley.

In the mid 1960s, Henley played in an East Texas quartet called Felicity that

Hatchett booked regionally. Felicity garnered enough attention to release a 45, but in the process of wooing their future producer Kenny Rogers, they changed their name to Shiloh and headed to California. When Shiloh's record stiffed, Henley took a gig backing Linda Ronstadt at the Palomino. Those bandmates became the Eagles.

Four decades is a lot of time for Don Henley to remember

an agent from his formative years, but the future Eagle learned a basic lesson through Charlie Hatchett: Success on any level is built with a team.

#### Good To Be a Chevelle

"It's cool to be a Chevelle," declares guitarist Todd Potter. "Sometimes the audiences is bluehairs, and still we manage to dig into grooves that reward us. I always come away saying, 'It's good to be a Chevelle.'"

The current lineup of the Chevelles is Potter's vehicle of choice these days when he's not steering recently revived psych rock pioneers Bubble Puppy. As a teen, he joined Bubble Puppy and sped up the charts in 1969 with "Hot Smoke & Sasafrass." The band's shift from Texas to

California following first LP A Gathering of Promises caused friction in the group. A major label deal on ABC/Dunhill, where labelmates included


the James Gang, the Mamas & the Papas. and Three Dog Night, foundered. The label pressed the disheartened band to change its name to Demian. While on tour back through Texas, Demian stopped into Hatchett Studios.

"It was an error on everyone's part to change our name," says Potter today. "No one knew who we were when we came back as Demian. Charlie's law office was on Medical Parkway, around 45th, and he had a studio there. We wrote and recorded our demos for ABC at Hatchett Studios.

"I think more bands cut demos there than anywhere in town back then. When we became Sirius, Charlie booked us regionally.

"I'd hung up the music business in the Eighties, went through years of not playing, then about 10 years ago, my wife and I started going to see Charlie's band. Charlie kept twisting my arm to sit in and sent me a stack of tapes, saying, 'Brush up on these, because we would love to have you play with us.' I did, and I really enjoy playing and am glad I came back.

"I owe it to Charlie I started playing again."

#### Let's Make a Deal

Charlie Hatchett Jr. chuckles amiably on the telephone, much more soft-spoken than his name suggests. At 72, he recalls his career with great fondness, serving as agent and client for himself, his own bands, and thousands of others.

Hatchett

today.

"The best band with the most potential I ever booked was Krackerjack," he states unequivocally. "That's one band I will never understand why they didn't get big. They were ready to go, so creative. Maybe it was Uncle John Turner being so ornery that he scared off [ZZ Top manager] Bill Ham. But he knew his music." (See "The Beat Goes On: R.I.P. Uncle John Turner," Earache! Music blog, July 26, 2007.)

"And Tommy Shannon, so great. Stevie Vaughan played with them some, then with Blackbird."

Booking for today's market presents challenges Hatchett no longer faces since his son Charlie Hatchett III took over the agency in 1995. Still, it's a long way from when "we'd get Billboard out and look bands up and see if we could make a deal."

"The problem I see with today's agents is it's hard to compete with so many bands available in the Austin area. The difficulty is in representing the band and not the club or the buyer. It's hard to keep bands booked all the time because there's so much competition. If you hold out for more money, these club owners say, 'I'll find a band to play for nothing,' and they can. That's the problem. Agents today more or less represent the club rather than bands."

David Cotton can testify to the benefit of an agent that truly works for the client: Charlie Hatchett booked his first gig in 1975 drumming for Rabbit.

"I was playing bars and parties my junior year of high school," recalls Cotton. "Spring lions. We toured San Angelo; Hobbs, New Mexico; Colorado - we were big in Pueblo! Cheyenne, Wyoming; and back through Oklahoma City. Weeklong gigs he booked us on. We probably got paid about \$1,800 a week, and 15 percent went to Charlie.

"My rent was \$75 a month."

He also admits the downside of having been one of maybe 50 bands Hatchett worked on any given weekend. Competition was fierce. And Hatchett watched the trends.

"Animal House came out, and we learned all those songs," recalls Cotton. "Once we got paid \$500 to sing 'Evergreen' at a wedding. And when Peter Frampton got big, Charlie sent us to buy satin pants and platform shoes. You could try to compete with Stevie or Christopher Cross or go play cover gigs with Charlie Hatchett. How good was it to play cool joints and shitholes when you're young?"

#### **Till the Cows Come Home**

Cycles come full circle Sunday at Threadgill's World Headquarters when Cotton pays musical tribute to the Hatchett man, currently being treated at M.D. Anderson in Houston for a second round of cancer. This is a genuine celebration - not a benefit, not a fundraiser. In fact, it's free. Hatchett took his percentage long ago.

Charlie Hatchett's looking forward to the show, naturally, featuring past and present Chevelles, John and Al Staehely from Spirit, and even a 2011 version of Krackerjack, among others. Back at his longtime Marble Falls ranch, however, he has more pressing issues.

"We're in the process of moving cows," he explains. "We've got a drought, and we have to sell our herd. It's so sad. Thirty years in the making. I can hardly look them in the face.


"But that's life."











#### Scott H. Biram Bad Ingredients (Bloodshot)

Contrary to both the back cover and liner notes to eighth full-length Bad Ingredients, Scott H. Biram isn't just a oneman band. He's the one-man band, a CB radio poet cultivating his own genre - Lo-Fi Mojo - for the past decade. Bad Ingredients mines the best of Biram's previous two Bloodshot platters, including the midnight ramble of 2006's Graveyard Shift ("Broke Ass") and its bruised hangover Something's Wrong/Lost Forever three years later (Delta-deep lament "Just Another River"), but there's far more at work here. The shattered, highway contemplation of "Open Road" is reflected in waves of distortion and Western-noir guitar à



la Neil Young's Le Noise. Laced with Walter Daniels' searing saxophone, voodoo boogie "I Want My Mojo Back" blows smokestack R&B, while Biram gets his ham glazed in "Victory Song," on par with of Black Joe Lewis' Scandalous. Penitentiary blues "Born in Jail" walks the green mile shoulder to shoulder between Lightnin' Hopkins ("Have You Ever Loved a Woman") and Bill Monroe ("Memories of You Sweetheart"). From cow-punk ("Killed a Chicken Last Night") and DIY metal ("Dontcha Lie to Me Baby") to gritty classic rock ("Wind up Blind"), Biram proves the ultimate outlaw. (One-man band Scott Biram loads into the Continental Club Saturday, Oct. 8.)

#### Carolyn Wonderland Peace Meal (Bismeaux)

If the first track off Carolyn Wonderland's Peace Meal sounds unexpectedly countrified, listen



up: Wonderland just tapped into rare Janis Joplin track "What Good Can Drinkin' Do" and stamped it as her own. That may be the only concession outside her traditionally volatile blues, and Peace Meal serves it on a platter steaming with soulful strut. Singer-guitaristsongwriter - sometimes those first two in reverse - the ex-Houstonian reined in not only Larry Campbell (Dylan, the Gourds) but also Ray Benson and Mike Nesmith for various producer duties, three cooks that didn't spoil the righteous flavor of her originals ("Shine On," "St. Marks," "Victory of Flying") or delicious covers of Muddy Waters ("Two Trains"). Elmore James ("Dust My Broom"), and Robert Hunter ("Golden Stairs"). Meanwhile, the sinister subject matter of "Cross and Flowers" is sparked by a subdued guitar duel between Bonneville and Morlix. The disc ends on the upbeat "Funny 'Bout Love," a remarkably lighthearted moment after 35 minutes of gloom through the floods of "Mississippi" and the Southern Gothic title track. #### White Denim Live at Third Man (Third Man Records)

Produced by Jack White for his Third Man Records in Nashville, Tenn., the 11-song, vinyl-only Live at Third Man will be packaged hopefully one day into the deluxe version of White Denim's

latest knockout, May fulllength D. Nine of its tunes come from the local quartet's new disc. an endlessly engaging jigsaw puzzle of subtleties

The tide finally washes in a closing couplet off D for divine, the rhythmic shake-'n'-bake of agitated soother "River To Consider," whose soaring solo coulda/shoulda/woulda taken up its own whole side, and clanging, banging ender "Is and Is and Is." White heat.

Cleaves, and James McMurtry, among others. Erin Ivey's solemn reading of "Johnny Has Gone for a Soldier" finds the young local songstress expanding her voice in a way that's stunning. #### Sunny Sweeney Concrete (Republic Nashville)

Sunny Sweeney's got the chops: a hard-bitten Texas twang that can cut with both coyness

and attitude, unapologetic about the kind of country she was raised on. Which is what makes the Longview native's sophomore LP so disappointing. Concrete is gritty but so watered down by contemporary Nashville arrangements that nothing sticks. Every musical turn is predictable and trite: the electric guitar licks and country-rock fiddle of opener "Drink Myself Single," the steel accents of unconvincing regret on "From a Table Away," the verse-closing hard stops of "Worn Out Heart." Worse is that Sweeney doesn't seem to be convincing herself either, whether pleading on "It Wrecks Me" and "Staying's Worse Than Leaving" or partying on "The Old Me." The only exception is "Amy," which rises simple and earnest as the session hands take a backseat. Sweeney needs more instinct and less influence.

#### Elaine Greer **Annotations**

WHITE DENIM

In Austin's the Sour Notes, Elaine Greer is a quietly compelling figure floating amid lush layers of the band's indie-pop cool. For



her solo CD, Annotations, she doesn't necessarily veer from that form, but its sharp vignettes read like footnotes to her life, hence the title. And if Greer's tone isn't strident, neither is she a shy violet. Such songs as "Everything Works Out," "Can't Go Back," "Wave," and "It Rains, It Pours" are statements of the heart, soothing and optimistically sung in her clear, lingering voice. Annotations' silky, often delicately acoustic instrumentation imbues every track with gentleness and warmth. "Put small fires out with your hands," she advises on "Small Fires," knowing that if getting burned is part of the risk, healing and a tougher skin are part of the lesson.

#### **LEAD STORY**

The medical establishment generally regards placentas (afterbirth) as biohazardous waste, but to New York City placenta chef Jennifer Mayer, they are a nutrient-laden meat that can alleviate postpartum depression and aid in breast milk production, among other so-farunverified benefits. Mayer typically sets up in clients' own kitchens, she told New York magazine for an August story. Some placentas are "really intense, with grief or sadness or uncertainty." Others might be "joyful" or "big and round." Mayer's method: Drain the blood, blot dry, cook for a half-hour (leaving something resembling brisket), chop into slivers, dehydrate overnight (rendering it jerkylike). For a popular touch, Mayer then grinds it in a blender and pours the powder into several dozen (one-a-day) capsules.

#### **CAN'T POSSIBLY BE TRUE**

The Learning Channel's *Toddlers & Tiaras* series has pushed critics' buttons enough with its general support of the competitive world of child beauty pageants, but a recent episode provoked unusually rabid complaints, according to a September *New York Post* report. Mother Lindsay Jackson had costumed her 4-year-old Maddy as "Dolly Parton" – an anatomically correct (chest and backside) Dolly Parton. The *Post* described Maddy as embarrassed at her chest when another 4-year-old pointed at her and asked, "What is that?" (Ultimately, the judges liked Maddy – for "sweetest face.")

Things You Didn't Think Existed: 1) World Record for Length of Tonsils: Justin Werner, 21, of Topeka, Kan., was certified in July by *Guinness World Records*, with tonsils measuring 2.1 inches and 1.9 inches, respectively. The old "champion" was Justin Dodge of

Milwaukee. 2) Global Competition in Dominos: In October, the breakaway Georgian region of Abkhazia will be the site of the world domino championship. (Twenty-five countries belong to the International Domino Federation.)

Retired U.S. Army Sgt. Maj. Rob Dickerson finally received his Purple Heart this summer, four years after he was seriously wounded in a rocket attack in Iraq and two years after he began a paperwork battle with the Army to "prove" his injury. Recently, the Army had apologized and mailed him the award, but it arrived C.O.D., leaving Dickerson to pay the \$21 fee. The Army subsequently reimbursed Dickerson the fee, but Dickerson said he hasn't been able to cash the check, because it was erroneously made out to "Roy Dirksen."

#### **INEXPLICABLE**

Madrid's Getafe soccer club, struggling for customers, startled Spain this summer by commissioning a porn movie, with zombies, hoping to attract more fans. As if that were not quixotic enough, it then tied the movie to a campaign to solicit sperm-bank donations. Explained the film's creator, Angel Torres, "We have to move a mass of fans to seed the world with Getafe supporters." A promo for the film follows a Getafe fan, armed with a copy of the movie for his viewing pleasure, as he disappears into a clinic's private cubicle to fulfill his donation.

#### **UNCLEAR ON THE CONCEPT**

"Do You See the Blimp Who Robbed You?": In August, 400-pound Eric Kenley, 48, won a new trial for his two New York City robbery convictions after appeals court judges realized that the police lineup that identified him was unfair, in that he was apparently much fatter than the other men in his lineup. The police

had attempted to compensate by using largerthan-average men and by presenting them all seated to minimize the weight difference.

Obviously intense about potential child-trafficking, the government of Quebec, Canada, requires strict proof of a live birth, certified by a doctor or licensed midwife. However, the waiting list to hire either one is long, and Heather Mattingsly went with an unlicensed midwife, whose word the Directeur de l'Etat Civil declined to accept. Four months after the birth, the agency ordered Mattingsly to submit to a vaginal examination. After "calls from the media" (according to a *Montreal Gazette* report) persuaded the agency that such an exam was useless, it finally agreed, on Aug. 26, to grant a birth certificate if Mattingsly submitted a doctor-certified copy of her pre-birth ultrasound.

You're Doing It Wrong: Jason Dean, 24, was arrested in Ringgold, Ga., in August and charged with false imprisonment after he waited in the parking lot of a Taco Bell, approached an 18-year-old woman and hand-cuffed her to himself. After her screams brought others to come help her, Dean explained that he had been trying for several months to get the woman to go out with him but that she had so far refused.

A New York Times obituary for former lead singer Jani Lane of the heavy metal band Warrant (Dirty Rotten Filthy Stinking Rich) revealed that Mr. Lane's birth name was John Kennedy Oswald (he was born a year after Lee Harvey Oswald assassinated President John F. Kennedy). Rebellious musicians often adopt provocative stage names to enhance their image, but Mr. Lane must be one of the very few to have abandoned a provocative birth name in favor of a bland one.


#### **LEAST COMPETENT CRIMINALS**

# Day Trips

Big Tex, the world's tallest talking cowboy, works three weeks a year. The 52-foot-tall official greeter for the State Fair of Texas in Dallas has donned his 75-gallon cowboy hat and size-70 family footwear since 1952.

Tex was born in Kerens, Texas, in 1949 where he was the world's tallest Santa Claus. The State Fair purchased his services for \$750 and gave him a makeover in 1952.

The fair dates back to 1886 when a group of businessmen started the annual event to showcase farming implements. The city of Dallas took over the enterprise in 1904, the same year the auto show was added. The Texas vs. OU game in the Cotton Bowl became a football classic when it was introduced in 1929. The 212-foot Ferris wheel, the tallest in North America, wasn't added until 1985.

#### **Aztex Back in 2012**

At a meeting of the Eberly's Army supporters group (née Chantico's Army) this weekend,

former Austin Aztex minority owner David Markley announced news we'd been hoping for ever since the Aztex left town precipitously last fall: Austin has a new team which will start play next May in the Premier Development League, the same league where the original Aztex started in 2008. Markley already has a PDL OK and obtained the Aztex name from Phil Rawlins (whose former Aztex are now Orlando City) but will keep little else from the former orga-

nization - except the fan network and possibly a few players. The red and white stripes will be gone in favor of a blue-and-gold crest for a logo (possibly blue and white for the uniform) - but, says Markley, just about anything could be up for discussion, "except one thing: the Austin" in the logo (and maybe also the accentuated ATX in Aztex). This will be an Austin team, he stresses, with probably more local players than the original Aztex, as well as more ties to different local communities, a lower ticket price, an all-amateur squad (at least to start), and a more cooperative structure and culture. Markley - a local techie with longtime involvement in the local soccer scene - is sole owner and president of ATX Soccer LLC, but he's already spoken multiple times about potential partnerships, and even possible public ownership à la the Green Bay Packers. There's much more to come, of course; two big steps will be announcing a home stadium and perhaps a head coach soon after.







50/50

50/50 isn't the first cancer comedy; Judd Apatow's Funny People took a whack at it only two years ago, with Seth Rogen riding shotgun there, too. But Funny People is really more a dissertation on a professional comic's damaged psyche, whereas 50/50

genuinely wants to explore what it's like for someone - specifically, someone quite young - to undergo the unimaginable awfulness of a cancer diagnosis.

Writer Will Reiser based the script on his own bout with spinal cancer in his early 20s. His real-life best friend, Rogen, plays his own fictional surrogate in the film, looking and sounding exactly like the Rogen we've come to know and - a lot of us, at least - love in Apatow films: kinda schlubby, emotionally stunted, and a fount of dick jokes. It's good to have him

back. Joseph Gordon-Levitt plays Reiser's stand-in, a Seattle-based National Public Radio producer diagnosed with a rare kind of cancer that comes with not great odds (the title's 50/50).

Gordon-Levitt is an actor who radiates decency - which sounds like the equivalent of a "really good personality," I know, but it's actually a pretty neat trick to pull off. He has dynamite charisma with Rogen and Anna Kendrick (Up in the the Air), who plays his therapist, Katherine, with a just-right swirl of tenderness and pep. And, in keeping with a character who is

decent, kind, and maybe too cautious. Gordon-Levitt skips big theatrics for tiny masterstrokes of emotion: a cock of the head when he sees Katherine for the first time as a woman, not a postdoctorate mouthpiece for bullshit healing exercises; an escaped wail for his mother as he goes into surgery; and so much winning matterof-factness in his delivery of Reiser's cuttingly funny writing ("Nobody wants to fuck me; I look like Voldemort").

Line to line, 50/50 dispatches the comedic and the dramatic with aplomb. Yet,

overall, there's some flabbiness (a girlfriend subplot that sputters on for too long, an aside about a volcano that feels like a mind's-eye metaphor that never quite caught

on the page). But mostly it's just terribly funny and sad and beautifully acted and terrifically feel-good for being, you know, a cancer comedy.

#### **NEW REVIEWS**

D: John Singleton; with Taylor Lautner, Lily Collins, Alfred Molina, Sigourney Weaver, Maria Bello, Jason Isaacs, Denzel Whitaker. (PG-13, 100 min.)

Taylor Lautner, the lupine heartthrob from the Twilight movies, here takes a solo leading role in a bid for bona fide action-star status. Sadly, both the drama and action in Abduction are tepid, and Lautner's kickboxing skills markedly outshine his emotive chops, although the failures of the former are due more to the lackluster involvement of director John Singleton while the failures of the latter have proven time and again to not limit the professional careers of many a dubious action star.

Abduction begins with a strong premise: While working on a school project, a teen discovers a photo of himself as a child on a website for missing children. But when highschooler Nathan (Lautner) confronts his mother (Bello) with the mystery, she and his father (Isaacs) are offed by unknown assassins mere seconds later. Nathan flees with his project partner Karen (Collins) and continues to evade the killers throughout the film. Questionable help and explanations come in the form of a CIA chief (Molina) and Nathan's psychiatrist, Dr. Bennett (Weaver), whom the teen has been seeing for "anger issues." Gradually, Nathan's recurring dream that the shrink always encourages him to repress and his deceased father's tough training in self-defense appear more than circumstantial. Molina and Weaver, who, most of the time, perform brilliantly, move through Abduction as if on autopilot. Singleton, in his first feature film in six years, also seems to have merely checked off items on his director's to-do list – reveal Lautner's buff abs in the opening moments, fiery explosion, kickboxing scene, wrestling scene, makeout scene, and so on - rather than fashion a compelling story or create genuine physical excitement. #### O DETECTIVE DEE AND THE MYSTERY OF THE PHANTOM FLAME

D: Tsui Hark; with Andy Lau, Li Bingbing, Carina Lau, Deng Chao, Tony Leung Ka-Fai. (PG-13, 123 min., subtitled)

As bodies begin to spontaneously combust prior to the coronation of Empress Wu (Carina Lau), the soon-to-be-ruler calls in Detective Dee (Andy Lau) to get to the bottom of the mystery. Never mind that she had him incarcerated eight years ago for criticizing her. Dee is a sleuthing mastermind on the order of a Sherlock Holmes or Agatha Christie, and thus the familiar form of the whodunit merges with this Tang Dynasty (circa AD689) period piece and action tale. A historical figure who has been popularized over time, Dee uses his wits as well as science to solve cases. Nefarious intrigue abounds in this mystery, and genre master Tsui Hark makes great use of computerized composites, classic wirework, and, of course, those unforgettable spontaneous combustions. The martial arts sequences are staged by the master, Sammo Hung. Creative spectacle, humor, and suspense drive the film, and we can only hope that Detective Dee and the Mystery of the Phantom Flame kicks off a new mystery franchise. - Marjorie Baumgarten ★★★ Alamo Lamar

#### **O** THE INTERRUPTERS

D: Steve James. (NR, 125 min.)

Filmmaker Steve James is apparently incapable of making an uninteresting documentary, even when his subject matter might presumably be thoroughly played out. James, who has already garnered enough film-festival awards (and an Oscar nomination for his breakthrough 1994 doc, Hoop Dreams) to merit multiple mantelpieces, tackles Chicago's soaring crime rate, and in particular the work of CeaseFire, a community-based interventional program founded by epidemiologist Gary Slutkin. Youth gangs and tragically abbreviated lives are nothing new in Chicago's often violent history. In the 1980s and 1990s, the city's trouble-plagued Cabrini-Green housing deveiopment became such a treacherous eyesore and focal point for national outrage that it was demolished. (Not before having partially inspired the Candyman horror franchise, though.)

What makes *The Interrupters* as engaging – and harrowing – as it is comes as much from James' skillful editing of "one year in the life of a city grappling with violence" as it does the subject matter. Similar in its story arc to *Hoop Dreams*, *The Interrupters* unobtrusively follows the stories of both those who commit the violence and the CeaseFire members, whose primary goal is not to dispel gang violence but to "interrupt" it just prior to or soon after violence occurs. The group mediates emotions in the hair-trigger spaces between sadness, grief, anger, and deadly action, and its members are nearly all former gang members themselves.


Chief among them is Ameena Matthews, a former lieutenant in an otherwise allmale gang and the daughter of Jeff Fort, one of Chicago's most legendary bad guys. (How bad? Fort is currently incarcerated for conspiring with Libya to commit domestic terrorism.) Matthews, now a mother and married to an imam, has street cred that's key to respect, as does Latino CeaseFire member Eddie Bocanegra, who continues to work with the organization even after its budget is slashed and he knows he'll no longer be paid.


The Interrupters opens in the spring of 2009 when a record 124 murders had already been committed in Chicago, a tally that rivaled the United States' Afghan campaign in terms of sheer body count. Hampering the violence is a monumentally difficult task but one that CeaseFire founder Slutkin compares, in an apt analogy, to containing an infectious disease in a densely populated, poverty-ridden urban center. He should know. He was the director for tuberculosis control in San Francisco and worked for the World Health Organization, where he helped contain epidemics in Somalia, Uganda, and what seems like virtually every other East and Central African hotspot.


As everyone notes, CeaseFire has a Herculean task in Chicago's predominantly African-American Englewood neighborhood, but no one seems ready to give up or even back down, Interrupter or otherwise. It's a year in the life and death of the fight against the streetwise status quo, and James' doc brings it all horrifically home.



#### **KILLER ELITE**

D: Gary McKendry; with Jason Statham, Robert De Niro, Clive Owen, Yvonne Strahovski, Dominic Purcell. (R, 100 min.)

The opening text crawl announces "the world is in chaos," pointing to economic and oil crises. Yup, that sounds familiar. And then, the "gotcha" reveal: The year is 1980. Alas, that's the last time Killer Elite will remotely ruffle expectations, and there's still 99 minutes to go.

Frequent action hero Jason Statham - who is just bald enough to pass for an everyman, at least in Hollywood-speak - plays a retired contract killer named Danny who is pulled back into the game when his former partner (a rumply De Niro) is kidnapped. The plot, based on a nonfiction book by Ranulph Fiennes, teases some political intrigue when Danny is forced into a cat-and-mouse game that begins in the Arab state of Oman and leads to an ex-British special-forces operative (played by Owen with a dirty little mustache). Just a tease, it turns out: There's nothing here for the viewer to do, no kinks to work out, no double-crossings to anticipate, not even a half-hearted flail at figuring out how Danny ticks. Lacking a premise with the trashy-fun lure of Statham's Crank or the knotty narrative pleasures of the Bourne series (which Killer Elite rather desperately wants to be), the overlong, perfunctory Killer Elite is simply a series of (reasonably well-choreographed) assassination sequences. Still, that shot of Statham tied to a chair and launching through a second-story window, which the trailer wisely hyped? Solid gold. - Kimberley Jones

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#### **O THUNDER SOUL**

D: Mark Landsman; narrated by Jamie Foxx. (PG, 83 min.)

Inspirational in the very best sense of the word, Thunder Soul brings in da funk. Landsman's documentary, which had its world premiere at SXSW 2010, works on many levels. The film's music will get your body grooving, the story's history will spark a greater understanding of the "times they are a-changin'" social milieu of late-Sixties/ early-Seventies America, and its implicit argument for the value of arts education in public

schools will ignite a fervor that no speech, declaration, or study could ever equal. Thunder Soul tells the story of the Kashmere Stage Band, and before the film is through, this high school band you've never heard of will have earned a top spot on your personal hit parade.

In its heyday (1968-1979), this Houston high school band won several national contests, conquering racism with the strength of its music and travels as far away as Japan to perform it. The band was led by Conrad O. Johnson Sr. (whom everyone calls Prof), a jazz musician in his own right who stayed in Houston to teach school and raise a family with his beloved wife. His expectations of excellence prodded the band's success. and his musicianship allowed him to draw on the funk stylings of the day to compose and choreograph pieces that yanked the lid off the staid but pervasive jazz rhythms to create something thoroughly funky and original.

The film is structured around a reunion of members of the Kashmere Stage Band, who have gathered to perform a concert in honor of Prof's 92nd birthday. Many of the middle-aged participants haven't touched their instruments in 30 years, but their oncamera recollections and a wealth of archival material establish a vivid record of what the group accomplished. Crazy Afros, an all-girl trombone line, and the rise of the black pride movement all have parts to play in this transformative story. An unexpected third-act climax adds drama due to Prof's deteriorating health. The alumni's ultimate reunion performance culminates the film on an exhilarating note. Music has rarely appeared more essential to the human drama.

by the end of her first week at work she's making out in a bar with the shop's owner. Pacing problems and shallow psychological inquiries plague this film almost as much as the overworked metaphor that supplies the film's title. Nevertheless, the performances of Gainsbourg and Morgana Davies, who plays her 8-year-old daughter Simone, shine like glorious gems.

The O'Neil family lives in rural Australia in a house built on stilts, which sits beside an ancient tree. The tree's gnarled and enormous roots threaten the home's plumbing and it's a nuisance to the neighbors, but after her father's death, Simone comes to believe that her father inhabits the tree. Before long, Dawn climbs its branches, too, and begins talking with her deceased spouse. Julie Bertuccelli, in her follow-up to 2003's Since Otar Left, has adapted Judy Pascoe's 2002 novel, Our Father Who Art in the Tree, for the screen. As things progress, it becomes clear that only an act of God or a heavy-duty chain saw can impede this tree's influence over their lives. Sometimes the family tree must be uprooted, and so it goes when one is left with more metaphor than movie. - Marjorie Baumgarten

#### TUCKER & DALE VS. EVIL

D: Eli Craig; with Tyler Labine, Alan Tudyk, Jesse Moss, Katrina Bowden, Brandon Jay McLaren, Christie Laing, Chelan Simmons, (R. 86 min.)

Referencing everything from Deliverance to The Evil Dead to Fargo and nailing its central conceit dead-on (literally!), this is one of those rare genre comedies that near-perfectly balances its blend of grue, guffaws, and gag reflexes. Tucker & Dale vs. Evil premiered in Austin during SXSW 2010 and has languished on the shelf for the better part of two years. Why? Possibly because it's the sharpest tool in a Camp Crystal Lake shedful of rusty remakes and dull, witless horror sequels that have littered the cinema of late, like so many good-looking but conceptually dead teenagers.

Tucker (Tudyk) and Dale (Labine, of A Good Old Fashioned Orgy) are a pair of amiable, PBR-guzzling "hillbilly" pals who plan to spend their vacation relaxing at the former's newly purchased summer home in the woods. Stopping off at Last Chance Gas to fill up on fishing supplies and beer, they encounter a group of clean-cut frat kids led by alpha male Chad (Moss). In an attempt to boost his friend's shaky self-esteem, Tucker urges Dale to talk to leggy blonde Allison (Bowden), but the bumpkin's bib overalls and anxious smile only serve to frighten the city kids. Later, after one of the frat boys runs afoul of a sternum-piercing tree branch while high, the other kids assume it's the murderous handiwork of the two rednecks from the store, and the stage is set for some serious Grand Guignol and a first-rate comedy of errors.

Tucker & Dale's genius running gag is that the whole nightmarish contretemps is one big misunderstanding. With teenagers dying all around them, Tucker and Dale assume they're under siege by some sort of death cult, while the genre-savvy teens believe they've stumbled into a hillbilly chainsaw massacre. The whole thing is pitch-perfect, up to and including a goofily touching semiromance between Dale and Allison.

Craig (who co-wrote the clever and genuinely funny script with Morgan Jurgenson)

plays off genre and real-life stereotypes with giddy panache, and Tudyk and Labine make their respective characters far more than the walking horror tropes they first appear to be. Their banal between-bloodshed banter, as when they first lay eyes on Tucker's Evil Dead-esque "vacation home" and declare it beautiful, is particularly winning. If every horror outing had as much heart (and viscera) as Tucker & Dale does, there'd be a lot fewer unnecessary sequels and remakes. - Marc Savlov

Should What's Your Number? tank at the box office, then the people who make it their business to analyze those numbers will probably argue the poor turnout represents some kind of referendum on women in hard-R, raunchy comedies. Don't believe 'em. If What's Your Number? marks a referendum on anything, it's Anna Faris, a film comedian the media has been trying to "make happen" for ages now. Witness a 10-page feature in The New Yorker this spring, in which Tad Friend itemized Faris' appeal as "mixing a jigger of Judy Holliday, a dash of Goldie Hawn, and a pinch of Sid Vicious to brew a winsome bubblehead." So she's got a funny voice; she's habitually played dumb-blonde, pratfalling broads; and she's a snap with four-letter words. What didn't make it into the soup: Holliday's tart smarts, or Hawn's joie de vivre, or Vicious' daring.

Faris has had smaller turns in celebrated movies (Lost in Translation, Brokeback Mountain), starring roles in movies not many people saw (The House Bunny, Smiley Face), and top billing in a blockbuster spoof series no one went to for the acting (the Scarv Movie franchise). But What's Your Number?, which she also executive produced, ups the stakes significantly. She's in virtually every scene of the film as an unlucky-in-love thirtysomething named Ally Darling. She's fired from her marketing job within minutes of the film's opening, although we don't know it's a marketing job until later. Come to think of it, we don't know why she was fired, either, but she doesn't seem to care much, so why should we? More salient to the film's purposes is the magic number. It's 20, in Ally's case - that's 20 sexual partners - which is the same number claimed in a Marie Claire article to doom a woman's chances of marrying successfully. So Ally resolves to revisit old lovers, figuring one of them must have matured into marriage material over the years. Problem is, there's a sexy shirtless neighbor (played by Chris Evans) who wants very much to take Ally to 21.

There are a number of elements that go deeply wrong here. The script (by Gabrielle Allan and Jennifer Crittenden, based on Karyn Bosnak's book 20 Times a Lady) lands a laugh about once every eight minutes - not a great pace for a comedy, and the film is hapless when it comes to the crucial third-act transition from comedy to "shit just got real" drama. The soundtrack is distractingly bad - the canned crap the theatre pipes in for pre-show entertainment is better than What's

Your Number?'s banal rock ballads. And the filmmakers' graceless attempts to insert more flesh into the film hits its nadir with a game of strip H-O-R-S-E, improbably set at the Boston Garden, that is frankly embarrassing to watch.

But what goes most wrong is the casting. Every facet of Faris' performance feels off. (It's hard not to look longingly at Ari Graynor, who plays Ally's sister, and wish she were starring instead.) Faris' Ally isn't fun; she's a black-out drunk. She isn't flighty; she's dim. She's isn't adorable; she's one long, over-emoting spasm of nose-scrunchings and eye-widenings. Apologists may point to the character – a hard partier on a psychotic quest - and put the blame there. Please. People acting like idiots is the warp and woof of romantic comedy. But they have to be likable idiots, empathetic idiots. Faris takes an already confused character and turns her sandpaper-abrasive. - Kimberley Jones

#### **APOLLO 18**

D: Gonzalo López-Gallego; with Lloyd Owen, Warren Christie, Ryan Robbins. (PG-13, 86 min.)

In his first English-language production, Spanish director Gonzalo López-Gallego has done an effective job of mimicking the look and sound of handheld documentation and closed-circuit footage. The premise is that the real-life, canceled Apollo 18 mission to the moon actually took place in 1972 and was documented slavishly by the three-man crew and a barrage of stationary cameras. There is little to say about the film's "baddie" - it's actually two-pronged: The astronauts slowly, simultaneously wake to befuddling tracks on the moon's surface and also to how alarmingly in the dark they've been kept by the Department of Defense, which strong-armed the mission away from NASA. The hints we get of alien life are ill-formed and never satisfying, but López-Gallego well uses the limited-by-design camera footage. It never amounts to all that much, but Apollo 18 is an intriguing, if never enthralling, fusion of period spaceflight procedural, conspiracy theory, and monster - Kimberley Jones movie. Although its immigrant, working-class milieu is drenched in realism and heartache, A Better Life rarely transcends its predictable, programmatic structure. A single father, Carlos Galindo (Bichir) ekes out a living gardening and sleeps on the couch of the run-down apartment he shares with his son Luis (Julián), who is steadily drifting toward gang life. When Carlos buys his friend's truck, a cruel twist of fate befalls him: The truck is stolen, and father and son set out to find the thief. A Better Life is, indeed, a heart-tugger about the countless undocumented workers who are rarely depicted as the subjects of their own stories, but the film never stretches its boundaries. A disciple of Luc Besson (who co-wrote the script), Olivier Megaton simply does not live up to the Hiroshima-leveling explosivity of his surname: Colombiana is one long megayawn. Zoe Saldana (Star Trek) - Colombiana's assassin, Cataleya, who's hunting her family's killers - is easy enough on the eyes. What's missing from this film is any sense of import. And suspense. And originality. Colombiana's meandering story kicks off as the waifish Cataleya witnesses the murders of her parents, who were somehow involved in the Colombian drug trade. Fifteen years later, this Cat has relocated to Chicago and grown 9mm claws and a penchant for blackon-black bodysuits. With the aid of her uncle Emilio (Curtis), she terminates 22 of the men involved in her family's demise before attracting the attention of Chicago Police Department's Detective Ross (James). Riffing on one of society's most ancient existential bugaboos - plague! - with a cool, near-documentarylike tone, Soderbergh outlines the Asian-borne emergence of a 72-hour bug that sports a mortality rate of 1 in 4. It arrives in America attached to Gwyneth Paltrow, who runs a fever and dies two days later, as does her 8-year-old son. Her distraught husband (Damon. solid and believable as the story's human center) is quarantined, and as the scale of the virus becomes obvious, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention head (Laurence Fishburne), World Health Organization representative (Marion Cotillard), and Trapper John McIntyre (Elliott Gould) work feverishly to crack the viral code. Social chaos, looting, burning, and Internet-fed hysteria ensue. Soderbergh's vision, true to life though it may be, makes for an oddly uninvolving apocalypse. Based on a 2007 Israeli film of the same title The Debt jumps between events in Tel Aviv in 1997 and East Berlin in 1966. In 1997, Rachel Singer (Mirren), along with her ex-husband Stephan (Wilkinson) and David (Hinds) are former Mossad field agents who have become Israeli folk heroes due to their heroic actions

three decades prior, when they captured Dr. Vogel, the "Butcher of Birkenau" (Christensen). The more thrilling aspects of *The Debt* reside in this espionage plot, where Chastain plays the younger Rachel, Worthington plays the younger David, and Csokas plays the younger Stephan. Perhaps the discrete delegation of the thrills to the 1966 story and the moral quandaries to the 1997 story is what prevents *The Debt* from really congealing. Life is rarely that neat. (09/02/2011)

Sawyer's affinity with the dolphin

helps him emerge from his shell, as does support from his mother (Judd) and the Hasketts. It's a little overloaded, but director Charles Martin Smith (*Air Bud*) handily keeps the sap at bay. The locally produced Incendiary, directed by Steve Mims and Joe Bailey Jr., artfully illustrates the technical aspects of the case. In 1991, Willingham's house in Corsicana, Texas, burned down with his three toddlers still inside. Charged with murder, he was found guilty and executed, though he never stopped insisting he was innocent. The case against Willingham was that the fire was arson. But when Willingham's advocates brought in fire experts to re-examine the investigation they determined the evidence was inconclusive. Scientific inquiry bumps up against political maneuvering - wanna guess which side comes out on top? Well, you know what they say: Everything's bigger in Texas, including the irrational hostility toward science, learning, and temperance, as this well-made, deeply disheartening film demonstrates. Forty years after the original film version by Sam Peckinpah shocked audiences with its slow-boil savagery, director Rod Lurie has attempted to capture the same outrage. No such luck this time, though. This Straw Dogs is all bark, with the occasional, predictable bite that fails to draw any emotional blood. Screenwriter David Sumner (Marsden) and his wife, Amy (Bosworth) have moved from Los Angeles to Amy's hometown of Blackwater, Miss., to fix up the house deeded to Amy by her late father. When David hires Amy's high school boyfriend Charlie (Skarsgård) and his motley crew to repair the property's barn, the tension is immediately apparent, and the film slowly spirals from a broody psychological thriller into an outright revenge/home-invasion horror mash-up. Ultimately, the remake is rote, at best. It doesn't ask you to ponder David's descent into brutal, primal masculinity; it merely asks you to watch it. And that, frustratingly, is nothing new at all. Meanwhile, older brother Brendan (Edgerton), a high school physics teacher with his own family and who severed all ties with his dad, returns to the cage to win the much-needed prize money. O'Connor's film has a gritty sensibility, resisting many opportunities to seal an easy resolution, and for this you remain with it until the final punch.
