

RED, WHITE, AND WOODIE

Last year, the MTVu Woodie Awards were a prime-time spectacle shoehorned into the Austin Music Hall. Thursday, the annual celebration of college buzz bands took over the parking lot behind the Austin Convention Center for an all-day, two-stage marathon hosted by Matt Pinfield, with free barbecue from the **Salt Lick** in lieu of a red carpet. While still heavy on major-label fodder, there were breakout performances well before the start of the official program. Brooklyn rapper A\$ap Rocky had blunt rhymes and Southern swagger that leaned back like Houston circa 2003. Austin's Gary Clark Jr. took off next, alternating between Hendrix's heavy psych and **Dan Auerbach**'s grit-blues, and then sweet Motown soul only hinted at on his Warner Bros. debut EP Bright Lights. OTR caught up with Clark earlier to get the skinny on his appearance at PBS' In Performance at the White House: Red, White and Blues and President Obama's closing refrain for "Sweet Home Chicago." "I didn't think he was going to do it." laughed Clark, who's currently working on demos for a full-length album. "I thought it was cool to see him up there and really appreciate the blues as an art form. It was one of those moments where I was like, 'Is this really happening?'" Asked what he's learned from playing with such prestigious company, Clark responded, "Turn up. I've got to crank my volume to hang with these guys."

CHIMES OF FREEDOM CONTINUES

Two years ago at South by Southwest, Wayne Kramer delivered a profound testimonial about his personal struggles with homelessness, drug addiction, and imprisonment – and his long road to redemption – that had inmates and yours truly choking up at the Travis County Correctional Complex. The occasion marked the U.S. launch of Billy Bragg's Jail Guitar Doors, the nonprofit that provides a creative outlet to assist inmates in the rehabilitation process. Kevin Hoetger, leader of the Austin pub-rock outfit English Teeth, has been helping to carry out the mission locally by providing weekly, 90-minute songwriting les-

sons – the longest allowed under visitation guidelines. "They give me a whole new perspective and appreciation for life," Hoetger told the *Chronicle*. "They gush about getting out and starting over." For tonight's showcase at **White Swan Lounge**, headliner **Tom Morello** is planning an Occupy flash mob that will march to and around the venue. "I thought it was important that at a music gathering of that size, to have a place where the rebels, revolutionaries, rockers, rappers, and the 99 percent could gather and have a mighty SXSW throwdown," the **Rage Against the Machine** guitarist told *Rolling Stone*. SXSW MUSIC KEYNOTE: BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN

Austin Convention Center, Thursday, March 15

Bruce Springsteen didn't take long during his poetic, sometimes profane, hour-long keynote speech before he asked for a guitar. It was part of the midday clinic the Boss performed, tracing his roots as well as the collective history of popular music from the Fifties onward, and though he didn't play a lot - mostly snippets to illustrate and underline key points - there was a tacit acknowledgement that the legendary rocker has done most of his best work armed with a six-string.

"Why are we up so fucking early?" Springsteen joked. "All the decent musicians are still asleep, or they will be before I'm done."

Consulting a shaggy sheaf of papers, a casually dressed Springsteen gave a speech that was energizing, and even electrifying, to his many acolytes in the jam-packed ballroom. Though he has a new album, the disquisition mostly looked backward. Inspired to pick up his first guitar at the age of 6 "by the excitement in Elvis' pants" on The Ed Sullivan Show, Springsteen said that at the time, an event like South by Southwest, with thousands of bands spanning the whole pop spectrum, would've been "a great teenage pipe dream."

"There just weren't that many guitars to go around," he mused. "We would have had to share."

But Elvis, along with Roy Orbison, the Beatles, Bob Dylan, James Brown, Curtis Mayfield, and others, lit a fuse that a young Springsteen and his peers soon helped detonate. Those artists gave rise to a sexual revolution and civil rights, reshaping American culture, and Springsteen, on his way to stardom, soaked it up.

"If you were a kid in the Fifties and Sixties, it just felt fucked. We didn't have the words. Dylan gave us the words.

"And the first thing he asked was 'How does it feel?"

Springsteen played the Animals' seminal "We Gotta Get Out of This Place," as well as a riff from "Don't Let Me Be Misunderstood" that he lifted for his own composition. "Badlands," from Darkness on the Edge of Town.

"Listen up, youngsters," Springsteen hooted. "This is how successful theft is accomplished."

Springsteen closed by talking about Woody Guthrie, who would have turned 100 this year.

"He's a big, big ghost in the machine," Springsteen observed as Guthrie's daughter Nora looked on. "Things that come from the outside, they make their way in to become part of the beating heart of our nation."

WOODY GUTHRIE AT 100

Austin Convention Center, Thursday, March 15

The celebration of Woody Guthrie's 100th birthday, a yearlong event, kicked off in Tulsa, Okla., five days ago. Panel moderator and Grammy Museum Executive Director Bob Santelli explained this week's events in Texas and those planned for the rest of the year as a celebration of the folksinger's legacy - why he was important then, now, and in the future. Two of Guthrie's children spoke about the man they knew. Nora Guthrie claimed that the Woody at 100 celebration will "visit as many states as possible to replant the seeds of his ideas. Of course we started in the red states." Rice University historian Douglas Brinkley spoke of an upcoming book that he helped curate, House of Earth, Guthrie's "only fully realized novel," and how it will broaden the artist's reputation of being incredibly difficult

to pin down to one art form. Arlo Guthrie was his usual persnickety self, rambling and highly amusing, yet he offered the most cogent analysis of why his father and Pete Seeger remain important in the 21st century. "They were links on a chain. They weren't singing in the key of 'me,' they were singing in the key of 'us.'" - Jim Caligiuri



2012: THE YEAR DANCE MUSIC KILLED ROCK & ROLL

Austin Convention Center, Thursday, March 15

It's not every day that legendary A&R man Seymour Stein is sitting next to Lee Anderson, the agent for Skrillex. Yet there they were, sitting on this panel to discuss whether dance music has overtaken rock. "Rock & roll has always had its ups and downs," said Stein, "but rock has managed to always change itself and keep going. It's spent 60 years in the front and center of the music business all over the world." The discussion floated to topics such as social media, touring, and recording for both genres. "It's a lot easier to manage a DJ," explained Simon White, who manages acts from both sides. "DJs can tour on one track a year, play gigs with CDs, and there's no band arguments." Audiences remain strong for both segments, and by the panel's end, it seemed clear that the two can coexist. Dance remains a major force,



though, and one hot topic was whether the communal vibe of dance music can survive once translated into stadiums. "A dance concert is about the people there," explained Pasquale Rotella, CEO of Insomniac Events. "They dress up, explore, look at each other, and dance. It's only recently that there's been a focus on the stage. Dance music doesn't make sense seated."

Of course a panel on Woody Guthrie would go long and eat into the time allotted for rock critic Ann Powers' interview with rock goddesses Ann and Nancy Wilson of Heart. Powers began by thanking the sisters Wilson for being there and turned to the audience to say, "You should be thanking these women for a lifetime of amazing rock & roll." Powers asked the women about Heart's trademark sound. "The consistent thing is our songwriting," said Ann. "The songs are the through line; the sounds can come and go and change, but the songs speak loudest."

Powers then transitioned to the gender issue, remarking that the Wilsons never played the victim as female songwriters, but rather that the songs evoked a sense of a female adventurer. "We were writing the songs from the perspective of a person in the world, not specifically a woman," said Nancy, who turns 58 today. The most touching moment of the interview happened during the Q&A, when a young woman testified that "Barracuda" had awakened her sense of herself as a musician and then expressed heartfelt gratitude to the Wilson sisters for clearing the rock & roll path for female musicians. - Melanie Haupt


"Cookout" and "Taylor Gang," but Khalifa let Woods do most of the heavy lifting. While most packed the back room in anticipation of Wiz, they missed out on one of the afternoon's best sets by New Orleans' Dee-1, who introduced a fourpiece band for "One Man Army" and the Mannie Freshproduced "The One That Got Away." Following Woods and Kalifa, Flint, Mich., MC Jon Connor was dismayed more people were trying to snap Twitpics than hear him rhyme. "They're about to miss a crazy show," he chastised before backing up his words. Connor dropped conscious bars from his Season 1 and Season 2 mixtages while his massive, camo-clad street team served as human microphones. On the early end of the showcase, fast-rapping Rittz sparked a White Jesus Revival before Memphis, Tenn., rapper Cities Aviv launched an experimental assault full of echo effects and heavy distortion to a smattering of confused onlookers.



BROOKLYN VEGAN DAY PARTY

Hotel Vegas/Volstead Lounge, Thursday, March 15

Glen Hansard's guitar is a beautifully beaten machine. With three splintering holes gaping in a discolored crescent from the body, worn by time and the relentless strum of the Irish balladeer's balance of defiance and despair, it seems a physical manifestation of the battered wounds he brandishes in songs. Pitched between the anthemic pop of Icelandic sextet Of Men




commandeered the outside stage of Brooklyn Vegan's three-ring bash with a combination of vocal power and presence. Following an a cappella opener of traditional ballad "Spencer the Rover," he soared above the generator hum with "Love Don't Keep Me Waiting" and "Low Rising" and joked self-deprecatingly about sensitive singer-songwriters through the middle of "What Happens When the Heart Just Stops" before finally unplugging and pulling the crowd close for a sing-along of "Say It to Me Now." Meanwhile, inside the Volstead, local female quintet Feathers unloaded an impressive if still developing burst of heavy dual percussion and scuzzy psych with a danceable edge, setting up Ringo **Deathstarr**'s encompassing darkwave drone. **Hospitality** failed to hook behind the angular, punkish vocals; but Cymbals Eat Guitars buried the inside of Hotel Vegas with its raucous pop hooks. - Doug Freeman



CHECK YO PONYTAIL 2

Emo's East, Thursday, March 15

If Thursday afternoon's sparse turnout at the cavernous new Emo's East is any indication, the Riverside reach of South by Southwest's extraterritorial spread is still developing. Bay Area rapper K. Flay boasted skull-cracking beats and impressive word flow, but it all got swallowed up in the mix. San Francisco's Dirty Ghosts fared better with its sharp-edged post-punk, which was



delivered with all the spunk you'd expect from ex-Parchman Farm guitarist Allyson Baker, who took the stage wearing a ripped D.R.I. T-shirt. The split stage setup made most set changes efficient, but the technology-heavy Geographer ran late. The San Francisco trio's atmospheric, OMD-channeling electro pop got extra heft from effects-heavy strings and earnest vocal delivery, but it had to shut down before finding its groove. The Coathangers' herky-jerky jag and yowl was definitely undercooked but intriguing and plucky nonetheless. Blondes' cinematic electronic wizardry recalled a poor man's Tangerine Dream at times, while Mndr's onewoman, synth-sonic, air-raid disco attack scored on pure enthusiasm. Despite a muddy mix, Mississippi's Bass Drum of Death exuded a fine Memphian garage buzz. As curfew approached, Brooklyn-based Theophilus London's eclectic mash of hip-hop, rock, and reggae made a nice appetizer for the **Dum Dum Girls**. With coquettish frontwoman Dee Dee leading the way, the quartet's tightly packaged, flange-laden fuzz-pop carried the day. - Greg Beets


MESS WITH TEXAS 1100 Warehouse, Thursday, March 15

For lots of attendees, SXSW might as well be Mess With Texas. Curated by local promoters Transmission Entertainment, the three-day minifestival attracts everyone from emerging alt-teens to bystanders. Colorado's **Chairlift** was the first bigticket item. Once an Apple-commercial band, it now sports a peppy spunk to go with its watercolor synth pop. SXSW MVP front-runner the **Men** pummeled its way through sound issues with careening guitars and an unrelenting swath of percussion, the Brooklyn troublemakers making more fans at every show. San Francisco producer **Tycho** drifted in amniotic rambles, gell-

ing well with the audience and the gentle breeze. The DJ set of France's **Yelle** quickly morphed into a regular old Yelle show, much to the ecstasy of its gathered disciples. However, the biggest act was undoubtedly **Girls**, whose 3pm headlining slot made the 1100 Warehouse feel like a stadium. After a hefty touring schedule, the San Francisco duo may be at the peak of its powers. The psychedelic shock of "Vomit" bounced off the walls and needled the ears, a problem it could only dream of when it was playing house shows. It's hard to argue when cataclysm is so pretty.





FIONA APPLE **Central Presbyterian** Church, Thursday, March 15

If Wednesday's showcase at Stubb's was Fiona Apple's way of reigniting her immutable torment, last night's affair proved her queen of all nuance. Playing to a mostly hushed crowd inside the Central Presbyterian Church, Apple stuck to the same script as Wednesday's, ushering three new songs ("Anything We Want," "Valentine,"



and "Every Single Night") into a set that danced its way from "Fast as You Can" to "On the Bound," flirted through "Paper Bag" and "Extraordinary Machine," and shook violently upon "A Mistake" and "Criminal." The thrill lay in the reclusive star's subtle flair. She knocked her head from left to right, making her voice only partially audible at the end of "A Mistake," and whispered her way through parts of "Criminal" before coming back maddened with her hands clutched to her chest on the hook, "I've been a bad, bad girl," she sang breathy and low, like the wounds were still fresh - like 16 years ago was only yesterday.

CHARLI XCX

Central Presbyterian Church, Thursday, March 15

Despite the solemn, gothic mood emanating from the pew-seated crowd gathered at the Central Presbyterian Church, Charli XCX emerged like she had just finished signing autographs backstage. Decked in a fashionable tablecloth top, shredded stockings, and a



hairstylist's masterpiece, the British-born Charlotte Aitchison rocked the microphone like it was a daily routine. She slinked; she writhed; she gazed passionately into the sky with absolute fearlessness. It was pure playhouse pop, parts of the audience overwhelmed by her consummate gall. It was strikingly easy to forget the woman is a scant 19 years of age with only two tracks to her name. In fact, the whole show could've been digested as a sneak preview of a wayward debut album. The new songs were unblemished by even the slightest scent of subtlety, instead opting for ravenous, magenta synths and skull-shaking percussion, with Charli XCX switching between a gloomy, full-bodied roar and a fast-rap chirp. "Nuclear Season" and "Stay Away" remain her greatest accomplishments, and at this point, their crossover seems inevitable. Sure, Pitchfork featured her next to alticon Fiona Apple and blog topics Purity Ring and Grimes, but make no mistake: Charli XCX is a pop star at heart. - Luke Winkie















LEE FIELDS & THE EXPRESSIONS

Giving new album Faithful Man a live run, Lee Fields & the Expressions delivered 45 minutes of pure soul, or as the North Carolina native might say, a moment or two of pure bliss. Like last year's Festival breakout Charles Bradley, Fields isn't a great singer, but he pours every ounce of himself into his songs and chooses just the right moments to unleash the bloodcurdling scream that warrants the nicknames Little J.B. and Soul Brother No. 2. Unlike Bradley, this is anything but a debut for Fields, who began his career with a 1969 cover of James Brown's "Bewildered" and whose Seventies singles have been sought-after funk relics in collector circles. Fields shed his gator skin jacket after one song, saying, "It looks cool, but it's hot as hell in here." Things heated up further when the sixpiece Expressions, a crack Brooklyn band led by Truth & Soul Records co-founder Leon Michels, launched into sexy summertime anthem "Ladies" from 2009's My World. The aptly named "I Still Got It" and the title track teased the new album before the band closed



with "Honey Dove," a song as close to perfection as an R&B tune can get in the 21st century. - Thomas Fawcett



GARLAND JEFFREYS

The Palm Door, Thursday, March 15

"I'm going to be 68 in June," Garland Jeffreys boasted midset, sweat on his brow. "But I bet I have more energy than you." Save for last year's Sunday night performance at the Continental Club on Alejandro Escovdeo's annual closing South by Southwest bill, Jeffreys hasn't been to Austin in years, but there was a welcome cheering for both new old and new material. Appropriately, he kicked things off with "I'm Alive," a track from his new disc and first in 13 years, The King of In Between, Jeffreys repeating the phrase over and over as if trying to convince both the listener and himself. With a band of Austinites offering support – Mark Patterson on keys and guitar, Glen Fukunaga on bass, and Billy Masters on lead guitar - he blew through "Coney Island Winter" and got cinematic with "35mm Dreams." The ska beat of the classic "Modern Lovers" found Jeffreys prowling the audience. The entire band smiled at his antics even though they were sweating, too. Despite his youthful vigor, Jeffreys is really a little long in the tooth to pull off his punky anthem "Wild in the Streets." The set ended with an extended "96 Tears," false ending and all, leaving everyone anywhere but in between. - Jim Caligiuri

THE GRAMMY MUSEUM'S WOODY GUTHRIE CENTENNIAL TRIBUTE

St. David's Bethell Hall, Thursday, March 15

Woody's daughter Nora rechristened St. David's Bethell Hall "the church of songwriting" for her dad's 100-year hootenanny. Gathered inside were a collection of singers from Austin and beyond. David Garza and Carrie Rodriguez represented the modern wave of Guthrie fans by drawing from *Mermaid Avenue* material, while fellow locals Michael Fracasso and Colin Gilmore maintained glorious authenticity. Garland Jeffreys and Joel Rafael played unheard Guthrie compositions personally chosen for them by Nora. Ray Benson's appropriate version of "Philadelphia Lawyer" and Ruthie Foster's take on "Against the Law" brought down the house,

but a bigger ruckus was raised by Lila Downs, who got the crowd clapping to an electric medley of "Pastures of Plenty," "This Land Is Your Land," and her original lyrics. Family friend Jimmy LaFave headlined with a loud and soulful version of "Bound for Glory" and a country-rock version of "The Grand Coulee Dam" before Arlo Guthrie came out and brought every performer with him for a massive sing-along of "This Land Is Your Land." "That's the great thing about Woody Guthrie," said Arlo. "The man's been dead for a long time, and because of my sister, he comes out with a new song every day." He closed the night by teaching all in attendance an unknown Woody song that declared, "My peace is all I've got." - Kevin Curtin




BIG STAR 'THIRD' CONCERT

Paramount Theatre, Thursday, March 15

Almost two years to the day that Alex Chilton died before making an appearance at SXSW with his band Big Star, this concert re-created the band's last album, Third. The brainchild of Chris Stamey, the memorial of sorts put together an ensemble cast to flesh out the album, an endeavor that's already played in select cities.



At the historic Paramount Theatre, the group joined up with a host of special guests and enlisted Austin's Tosca String Quartet to further flesh out the songs. Both the heavy rotation of band members and array of bonus players – among whose ranks were Peter Buck, Tommy Stinson, and, much earlier in the evening, M. Ward – seemed to flummox Stamey, who worked very hard to keep the songs on point, as when Peter Case forgot the words to "Stroke It Noel." The wide stage also kept musicians from keeping in sync with one another. But here's the caveat: 1978's *Third* is a prickly, wonderful pop/rock disc that can survive a dash of chaos, so there's no need to be afraid of the unseemly and the unraveling. God knows Chilton wasn't.

THE LITTLE WILLIES/PUNCH BROTHERS

Antone's, Friday, March 15

God bless the Little Willies for returning Norah Jones to her Texas roots, because a voice that amazing deserves a little twang. "We put most of our Willie songs in the set tonight, so you might say we're a little Willie heavy," she quipped midway through before launching into a growling and raucous "I Gotta Get Drunk." The all-star quintet shines on country standards by remaining loose in performance but tight in execution, allowing a lightness that lifts even its heaviest cuts. The harmonies between Jones and Richard Julian on "Lovesick Blues" rippled high and lonesome, while Jones slowed Kris Kristofferson's "For the Good Times" with a stunningly wanting ache and tender torture matched by Julian's take on "Permanently Lonely." "Jolene" proved to be the showstopper, however, with Jones' pitched pleading rivaling Dolly Parton's original. Chris Thile's supergrass quintet, Punch Brothers, followed, making its SXSW debut in a fury of strings. The band's at its best working in the dynamic range of a live set, Thile's vocal drifts able to morph and bloom on "Movement and Location" and through the mercurial rolls of "Who's Feeling Young Now?" While Thile's metaphors push limits in songwriting, the band's constantly contorting breakdowns and closing stomp of "Rye Whiskey" moved with perfect organic interplay. - Doug Freeman

THE SHINS

Auditorium Shores, Thursday, March 15

The Shins had me at hello with Oh, Inverted World (Sub Pop, 2001). Chutes Too Narrow (2003) and Wincing the Night Away (2007) made up the soundtrack to the most profound changes in my life: namely, marriage and parenthood. We even took our toddler son to see the Shins perform at an Austin City Limits taping in 2006. Then the band imploded. Frontman James Mercer gutted the ranks, and I felt as betrayed as if he'd stolen my credit card and used it to buy a yacht on Costco.com. In short: James Mercer had the deck stacked against him in my book tonight. Did he redeem himself? Yes and no. Mercer and his new bandmates, which include guitarist Jessica Dobson (Beck) and drummer Joe Plummer (Modest Mouse), started their set with a retrofitted "Kissing the Lipless" and "Mine's Not a High Horse" from Chutes Too Narrow, and they didn't quite work - like trying on a pair of pants from your college days 10 years after you've gotten married and fat. On the other hand, tracks from the forthcoming Port of Morrow (Aural Apothecary), including "Simple



Song," had their own fresh and progressive appeal, enough to redeem Mercer. Rest assured, though, that I'm keeping a close eye on my Visa card this time around. — *Melanie Haupt*

"So I'm not going to say the name of our band. In case you don't like us, you can't talk shit about us afterward." The words from Palomar's frontwoman should be the motto for a new genre: insecurity-core. The Brooklyn quartet would be the poster kids of the movement. They've got everything needed to be legit because really, who doesn't want to see three cute girls play bliss-pop music? Not like rock-star huge, still good enough to be a thing – taut melodies, insouciant rhythms, smart lyrics – but there's no sauce. Or at least none consistent. Thing is, the solution might be something as simple as volume. Quiet parts seem to drip with doubt, but once they kick it in, it's like, "Hey, where was that in the verse?" Sure, playing with dynamics is part of a band's personality, but when the softer bits reveal the frailties, maybe it should find more excuses to rock out. Volume can do miracles. It might



His latest, Wrecking Ball, is a personal reckoning, an election-year treatise by a man in search of his country, his god, and his place between the two

- of hope tattered and bruised but not abandoned. For Springsteen, 63, answers are found onstage, and his more than two-hour performance proved an act of profound and assured deliverance. It began with a tribute to Woody Guthrie on the occasion of his centennial, "Ain't Got No Home," a folk ballad that swelled into a march of solidarity 17-strong, setting the tone for an evening of great recession protests. Wrecking Ball opener "We Take Care of Our Own" sounded not like an anthem but rather a condemnation of compromising politicians, with Springsteen forcefully punching down chords and following suit with the title track's fighting words: "Come on, take your best shot/Let me see what you got." In only the second engagement behind the new album, the E Street Band – bassist Garry Tallent, pianist Roy Bittan. guitarists Steven Van Zandt and Nils Lofgren, vocalist/wife Patti Scialfa, and drummer Max Weinberg, among other veterans - certainly rose to the occasion, bolstered by a fivepiece horn section with two saxophonists stepping into the large shadow left by the late Clarence Clemons. "We've lost some old friends, and we've got some new friends," Springsteen

noted early, "but the mission of the mighty E Street Band remains the same: to wake you, shake you, and bring you to higher ground." To that end, nephew Jake Clemons kept the Big Man's legacy alive with pride, stepping confidently into the spotlight for "Badlands" and "Waitin' on a Sunny Day." Rage Against the Machine guitarist Tom Morello joined in on three separate occasions: Irish eulogy "Death to My Hometown," hard-times lament "Jack of All Trades," and "The Ghost of Tom Joad," the latter taking the form of a Wild West duel between Springsteen and the Nightwatchman - all shadows, cinder, and gun smoke. While there was an underlying theme of struggle (the Smithsonian prison folk of "Shackled and Drawn" and Southern Gothic "Seeds"), the show concluded with jubilant healing in September 11 tribute "The Rising" and rousing Wrecking Ball closer "We Are Alive." Reggae legend Jimmy Cliff joined for the encore with a spry rendition of "The Harder They Come," and though the encores would continue on for some time and swell to include Eric Burdon and the Arcade Fire, it still made for a perfect ending, a rallying cry for the ages. - Austin Powell

'MOJO' EDITOR-IN-CHIEF PHIL ALEXANDER SPOTLIGHTS THE BEST NEW BRITISH TALENT

Michael Kiwanuka

In August 2001, Mojo assembled a CD to accompany an issue featuring Sly Stone on the cover. The disc was called Soul Riot and included a more intimate take of Otis Redding's "(Sittin' On) The Dock of the Bay." The issue sold well, but our team had no idea of the legacy it created among our younger readers.

Fast-forward 11 years, and the fruits of said disc have emerged through the voice and talent of Michael Kiwanuka, a 24-year-old North Londoner who admits that hearing that version of Otis' tune forced him to reconsider his musical route, diverting him from his otherwise indie-rock path where the likes of Radiohead were on heavy rotation.

"That was where my ears pricked up," he told Mojo earlier this year, discussing the song's impact on his younger self and his decision to begin sing-

ing. If all of this sounds like self-referential guff, it's not intended that way. It's merely designed to underline the fact that despite the recent success of prefab pop and talent-show bilge, the evergreen appeal of genuinely great music continues to hold sway over a new generation of musicians.

Indeed, Kiwanuka's second soulful epiphany followed when he heard Bill Withers' 1973 album, Live at

Carnegie Hall. Again, it proved a defining influence, and one that's audible on the relative newcomer's hugely impressive debut album. Home Again.

Of course, most attempts to marry rock music with folk sensibilities and soul grooves have been shining examples of how not to make music, but Kiwanuka

> manages to straddle both genres with the same effortless ease as Stevie Winwood during his Traffic days or even Richie Havens at his most compelling. The album's phenomenal opening track, "Tell Me a Tale," should be proof enough. Then again, Home Again is packed with material revealing that its creator has learned his lessons well.


In the UK, he's been rushed to the front of the queue in terms of artists most likely to dominate in 2012. It's undue pressure on a young man who's spent a number of years making his

own sound at his own pace. In fact, his U.S. shows will surely teach him more about his craft.

Tonight, he returns to the supportive environment of the Communion club night, where he will be joined by Daughter, Ben Howard, the Staves, Matt Corby, and the great, returning Willy Mason. That lineup alone tells you clearly it's an evening not to be missed.

Gary Clark Jr.

Noon, Radio Day Stage, Austin Convention Center

The bill for In Performance at the White House: Red, White, and Blues reads like the Mount Rushmore of living blues legends. Chisel in Austin's Gary Clark Jr. to the list.

The homegrown 28-year-old phenomenon found himself in rare company for the PBS special last month as part of the White House Blues All-Stars, led by Booker T. Jones and joined by Trombone Shorty and Mick Jagger. And Clark didn't just stand next to giants: He held his own, performing with ecstatic youth and veteran poise.

"I don't know how to explain," reflects Clark a week later. "There was no ego, no attitude, There was a lot of mutual respect. It was just smiles, heart, and antics. I'm still kind of tripping out over it"

Clark has had quite a few of those moments lately. In fact,

he's experiencing an ascent to prominence not seen since Jimi Hendrix lit the UK on fire. Following his breakthrough at Eric Clapton's Crossroads Guitar Festival and subsequent 2011 debut EP for Warner Bros., Bright Lights, Clark's impressed Paul McCartney, jammed with the Roots on Late Night With Jimmy Fallon, and collaborated with Alicia Keys, that last one inspired by the R&B singer discovering Clark's rendition of "While My Guitar Gently Weeps" with Will Taylor & Strings Attached.

"She saw a video on YouTube of me doing the song down in Austin," he confirms. More recently, Clark joined Clapton, Keith Richards, and James Cotton, among others, for Howlin' for Hubert, a tribute at the Apollo Theater to Muddy Waters' longtime guitarist Hubert Sumlin. For Clark, who performed "Shake It for Me" and "Cactus Blues," it was a natural and poignant way to pay final respects. He first jammed with Sumlin onstage at Antone's at age 15 - on a school night, no less.

"I've been playing for so long, when it's time to get up there and go, I just let go and do what I know how to do," Clark says. "I actually calm down when I get up there on stage. That's the most comfortable place for me to be."

"I don't want to be the artist who sold a million records but didn't change any lives," Dee-1 testifies. "I'm greedy, so I want to sell a million records and change a million lives."



"I knew it was a risk, but I felt it was necessary. I felt like I needed to be a voice and a leader for this generation, a leader for the urban youth. Me stepping out and doing this full-time gives me more of a platform."

Rapping with a syrupy Southern drawl and striking the perfect balance of cool and conscious, Dee-1 has a built a steady buzz with the I Hope They Hear Me mixtape trilogy and seems poised for a national breakout.

On his best known single he calls out "Jay, 50, and Weezy" for not giving back to their communities. The song caught the attention of New Orleans producer Mannie Fresh, who churned out a decade's worth of hits for Cash Money Records and helped turn Lil Wayne and Juvenile into household names. Their relationship began with a chance encounter in which Dee-1 gave Fresh his mixtape and phone number. Now they're collaborating on Mission Vision, Dee-1's forthcoming debut.

"I grew up listening to all the songs Mannie Fresh produced, that was the sound-



track to my adolescence," wonders the rapper aloud.

The pair's currently shopping for a label partner and laying the groundwork with a new mixtage.

Michael Kiwanuka

12:30am, St. David's Historic Sanctuary

The voice, a soft, rootsy howl, that's what draws you to Michael Kiwanuka. It's a bonus that the London folk singer possesses a down-to-earth charm and gift for simple, graceful songwriting that recalls the acoustic soul of a young Bill Withers. Kiwanuka, born to Ugandan parents, didn't have many musical touchstones growing up, but Withers and Jimi Hendrix were among the first he could relate to.

"I absolutely loved guitar growing up, but I never saw anyone on TV or in magazines that were young black people playing guitar," he admits. "I felt like it wasn't a thing that you did. Of course it was naive, but I was young and I had nothing to identify with. People used to write band names on their bags - rock bands, punk bands - and people would write Nirvana and Pennywise but Hendrix would be there, too, so I assumed that was another white band.

"When he came on TV, I saw he was a black guy with an Afro playing this kind of rock & roll and bluesy soul."

The 24-year-old is just getting started. After toiling as a session guitarist, he launched a solo career just last year, releasing three EPs, touring Europe with Adele, and landing a major label record deal. He recently finished a beautifully melancholic collaboration with Dan Auerbach of the Black Keys and won the BBC Sound of 2012 award, an industry poll predicting the next big thing in the UK.



"I wasn't expecting to get anywhere far with my music, but I've managed to open a few doors, which is really cool," says the singer, prepping the stateside release of debut Home Again for this summer. "I hope it just continues to grow and allows me to play bigger places and different countries - Thomas Fawcett around the world."

He recently finished a beautifully melancholic collaboration with Dan Auerbach of the Black Keys and won the BBC Sound of 2012 award, an industry poll predicting the next big thing in the UK.



Girl in a Coma 1am, Easy Tiger Patio

San Antonio dynamo Nina Diaz has been working on this new trick lately, one where she'll sing a line that conventional wisdom would have put on a guitar. It's most obvious on her band's cover of the Beatles' "While My Guitar Gently Weeps," but she uses the device often on last November's Exits & All the Rest, Girl In A Coma's fourth, for example toward the end of opening track "Adjust."

"It's badass," says the trio's bassist, Jenn Alva. "She's been doing it for a while, but we went on tour with the Black Box Revalation, and [singer Jan Paternoster] does a lot of that; he'll sing along to his solos, and she's since taken off with it."

A lifelong friend of Diaz's older sister Phanie, the band's drummer, Alva's used to seeing the magnetic singer develop by studying her idols. Shades of Morrissey creep into her lyrics; she owes her theatrical style to Björk.

On Exits, Diaz's progression lies in her decision to summon the influences of the band's rawkier rhythm section, a difference typified on songs like "Cemetery Baby" and "Adjust," which start quieter but move in places where they might have shown up hollow on earlier albums.

"Nina is so drawn to Jeff Buckley," says Alva. "She wants to be that kind of singer, one who can sing over everything. Phanie and I have always been such fans of punk and riot grrrl music, and I think she's battled that. She's had to work with us to blend things together."

It's a work in progress, but if these Girls can build on Exits' highlights, they may just fulfill a prophesy laid out five years ago by its Kenny Laguna, co-founder of Joan Jett's Blackheart Records for which Girl in a Comas has now cut three LPs.

"We were in the studio mastering Both Before I'm Gone and Kenny kept saying to us, 'All you got to do is stay together. You'll make your mark in music if you stay together." - Chase Hoffberger

The Drums' eponymous 2010 debut introduced the band with lead track "Best Friend," a synthesized rhythm of pure pop contagion undercut by the swooning opening line, "You were my best friend, but then you died."

It's a move stripped straight from Morrissey's songbook, and much of the Brooklyn quintet's music is drowned in a nostalgia of sound that eschews the contemporary by pushing it back to an essential pop sound.

"I think we have almost a fetish for nostalgia," laughs guitarist Jacob Graham. "We're always looking to the past, and when we do think about the

future, we like to think about it through the lens of a Sixties camera. I think a lot of that comes from trying to write really strong melodies. It used to be such a strong thing to have these really special, heartfelt melodies, so now, as soon as you write a melody like that, it automatically sounds like a throwback, because people weren't afraid to do that in the past.

"These days, when you have a really beautiful melody, it's almost a sign of weakness. It's not cool, even in pop music. I think that a lot of music has lost its personality."

That personality may rest upon pop whimsy, but the core duo of Graham and frontman Jonathan Pierce demonstrates a precision of self-production layered expertly on last year's sophomore effort, *Portamento*.

"We don't want 20 years from now for people to look back on the Drums and say, 'Oh, the Drums, they were such a 2000s band.' We want to be our own thing," insists Graham. "When you think of bands like the Ramones or the Zombies, they just seem like they existed in their own world, and we really like that idea."

Grape St.

8pm, Sony Club @ Red 7

Grape St. leader Curtis O'Mara is something of a disheveled pop shaman.

"He's got a pseudoreligion he's developed," Michael Coomers, his former cohort in locals Harlem, once told the *Chronicle*. "It's an amalgam of the playing cards he finds on the streets and shit he cuts out of people's hair."

O'Mara has a drunken poet's charm and a used car salesman's persistence, a combination that, as with Beck or Daniel Johnston, helps him turn psychedelic musings into perfectly shambled garage-pop songs.

"The best lyrics are the ones that are so dumbed down, simple, and beautiful, because you can reach everyone with that," O'Mara stresses one late night on the way to band rehearsal. "You don't want to make people think. You want people to get goose bumps all over their body when they're rocking out to your song."

While Harlem's 2010 Matador debut *Hippi*es had a soft spot for girl groups and Sixties beach party films, Grape St. has a bruised edge in line with the Rolling Stones. While only two songs have surfaced online, the Austin quintet has fin-



ished a full-length and nabbed an opening slot on the Sub Pop showcase.

"I'm not a pop songwriter; I'm just a filter, like a fish in an aquarium, which I have three of at my house, and they're gigantic," cracks O'Mara, outlining his creative process in a whirl of free association. "You can have them all lit up and then that's your main source of lighting. Then you play guitar and write pop licks. That's how it happens, just putting it down on 4-track and arranging it with the band.

"Then it becomes Grape St. Then you just cruise down the Grape Street" - Austin Powell

WONDER WOMEN!: THE UNTOLD STORY OF AMERICAN SUPERHEROINES

Documentary Spotlight D: Kristy Guevara-Flanagan; with Gloria Steinem, Lynda Carter

For a crowd that's all about fighting injustice, superheroes have never done much to address gender equality in their own ranks. It's a superman's, man's, man's world, and as this doc points out, few people can name more than one or two females in the caped crusader set. Wonder Women! focuses on the best-known one, tracing the Amazon princess' history inside and outside the comics and how it's reflected women's changing roles in American society. Four-color images of the golden age Wonder Woman pop! on the silver screen, lending visual support to the testimony of Gloria Steinem and others about the impact that images of this powerful female had on them. The film makes a moving case for the necessity of heroic women in pop culture, never more affectingly than when a fourth-grade girl who's teased at school tells how this fantasy figure in star-spangled shorts inspires her to never give up.

D: Jay Duplass, Mark Duplass; with Steve Zissis, Mark Kelly

Filmed in 2009 and back-burnered when Cyrus was greenlit, The Do-Deca-Pentathlon is Jay and Mark Duplass' good-natured comment on modern malaise. For twitchy family man Mark (Zissis) and lone-wolf poker pro Jeremy (Kelly), two estranged brothers reunited over a birthday weekend at their mother's house, disquiet is best hammered out through clandestine midnight ping-pong tournaments and arm-wrestling matches as they conduct a private 25-event Olympics. The argument seems to be that when we say, "I eat good food, but I need to work on portion control" or "I'm kinda bored with my job; I'm ready to move on to something else," we express a much deeper, complicated anxiety; for Mark and Jeremy, that anxiety is rooted in a grassis-always-greener envy of each other's lives. Despite a slow start, the New Orleans-set film is funny, sensitive, and expertly acted/improvised, a loving portrait of a sibling rivalry with healing properties. - Melanie Haupt

Hurts So Good

Mike Birbiglia mines life's embarrassments for laughs

Mike Birbiglia is rumpled and groggy, having just been roused from a midmorning nap on a sofa in the lobby of the Driskill Hotel. It's tough to be a comedian on the road, especially when said comedian is working two projects concurrently: Birbiglia is on tour with his newest one-man show, My Girlfriend's Boyfriend, as well as making stops at Sundance and South by Southwest Film to screen Sleepwalk With Me, based on his 2008 solo off-Broadway show.

Co-written with This American Life host and producer Ira Glass, Sleepwalk With Me is equal parts sleep-disorder memoir, ambivalent love story (featuring a luminous Lauren Ambrose), and standup comedian's Künstlerroman. It is sweet and charming, if a bit lacking in narrative cohesion, but is a testament to Birbiglia's particular talent for teasing genuine laughs out of life's most painful moments.

Birbiglia is not your typical comedian. Rather than lob punch line after punch line at an increasingly lubricated audience, he constructs a narrative that builds gradually so that by the time the story comes to an end, his interlocutors have encountered some larger truth or profound realization. It's the comedy version of eating a satisfying and nourishing home-cooked meal rather than gorging on a box of Twinkies. One will leave you content, the other sick and tweaking on sugar.

"I started out as a joke-joke comedian, emulating the comedians I admire, like Mitch Hedberg, Steven Wright," explains Birbiglia. "Over time, I was asked by the storytelling series the Moth to tell stories. The first time I did that, I told this really embarrassing story about my first girlfriend in high school." In the story, which Birbiglia had been too ashamed to share with anyone. ever, he recounts his discovery that his girlfriend has a second boyfriend, and finds himself having dinner at the girlfriend's house with her parents and the other boyfriend. "And I'm realizing I'm hanging out with my girlfriend's boyfriend. That was a really hard story to tell because I was so embarrassed about it. Every story is like that; I find that the more painful it is to get it out, if you can find the laughs in it, you can connect with an audience."

For Birbiglia, the goal of connecting with an audience informed the development of the celluloid adaptation of Sleepwalk With Me and led him to reject the Hollywood methodology. "We were developing this for a while with a larger company, and I'd written like 12 drafts of it and made so many changes," he says. "The Hollywood model is to develop scripts for 10 years, sell them, transfer them,

trying." With the help of co-producers Glass and Jake Jaffke, Birbiglia, who also directed, was able to take control of the project, and so far, it looks like the risk is paying off: Sleepwalk With Me was snapped up by IFC Films, which will distribute the film both here and abroad in the near future.

Meanwhile, Birbiglia must still put one foot in front of the other. Today, SXSW. Tomorrow, Boise, Idaho. Then Indianapolis. Then Cleveland. And on and on, even though the storyteller is exhausted, laughing and posing with adoring fans night after night, affixing his autograph to everything from boxes of cereal to Dustbusters. (Interested parties can view the gallery of crazy things he's signed on his Twitter page: www.twitter.com/birbigs.) But Birbiglia doesn't mind: He encourages it. "My relationship with audiences is much more special than my relationship with Hollywood. You're out on tour, the economy's bad, and people are so nice to buy a ticket and come to your show. So I try to encourage people to bring anything to the show, like, "Thanks for coming." There'll be time for sleeping later. Melanie Haunt

Local filmmakers David and Nathan Zellner's first feature since 2008's Goliath breaks several conventions. It opens with a demolition derby, but it isn't a comedy. It stars a child, but no one "comes of age." It follows a punk kid who steals candy from the gas station, but scrap any ideas about a freckle-faced boy in a baseball cap - the punk in question is a little blond girl named Annie (Aguirre). And the film features a lazy, indifferent father (Nathan Zellner), but he isn't a total jerk. (At times, he's even half likable.) When Annie stumbles upon a woman trapped in a well, her dad can't be bothered to get out of bed, leaving Annie to decide what to do in a world without conscience. With a strong soundtrack by Austin's the Octopus Project and beautiful shots of otherwise common places, Kid-Thing organically personalizes an old fable by surrendering the narrative to its protagonist. - Ashley Moreno



BAD BRAINS: BAND IN DC

24 Reats Per Second

When I was growing up in the suburbs of Washington, D.C., in the 1990s, it was impossible to avoid Bad Brains. Even though they were long past the peak of their powers by that point, the band - formed in the late 1970s by four African-American teenagers from the city - was and is widely acknowledged as the godfather of D.C. hardcore,

cranking up the speed and intensity of firstwave British punk and, in the process, giving birth to Minor Threat, Fugazi, and countless other bands, all while defying a whole host of racial and musical assumptions. Bad Brains: Band in DC follows the group on its most recent reunion tour, which is threatened as ever by its enigmatic, possibly schizophrenic madman/genius lead singer, H.R., who raised the art of post-Iggy Pop onstage energy to unimagined heights in the band's heyday but is now just as likely to antagonize an audience as lead it to ecstasy.

D: Jonas Åkerlund; with Matt Lucas, Juno Temple, James Caan, Dolph Lundgren, **Billy Crystal**

Franklin Franklin's (Lucas) life is in a rut, even if it is an unusual rut: Practice alphorn, check the mailbox in tighty-whities, listen to daily audio cassette sent from brother in the loony bin, eat pickle with mustard, repeat. But when "dispose of landlord's body" is put on the to-do list, things go haywire quickly. Director Åkerlund comes from a music video background, and it shows. The colors are saturated, and the camera flashes quickly forward and back through time to help us understand how Franklin got in this predicament. The characters and the shooting style seem made for one another, but over the course of a feature, the effect wears thin; by the hypercolored denoument, it barely registers. Lucas is cast perfectly as the underdog you can't help but root for, but the real standout is the muted Crystal, playing a small but pivotal role. Åkerlund should have trusted in his lovable cast rather than relying on camera tricks and surrealist touches to keep the audience's attention. But the movie stays on the rails, and the ride is bumpy but worth it.



A day at a swimming hole. A road trip. Spring break. A Skype chat. A Halloween party. All places you would expect someone with a video camera, and that's part of why this found-footage, horror-anthology shocker gets so under your skin. The directors are the bloody best of the mumblegore movement, so all are used to merging plausible characters with scares. The POV format never feels false: Instead, it's like front seat at the analogue gallows. Even the enigmatic wraparound story - a home-invading crew of thugs hunting down a mysterious video recording - provides no respite. So if you're looking for the Crypt-Keeper to laugh all the terror away, forget it. Each segment shocks in different

ways, from the supernatural to the simply malevolent, and the popcorn-tossing jumps are just as effective as the creeping sense of dread. Break off the "do not record" tabs: This V/H/S is a keeper. - Richard Whittaker

Festival Favorites D: Jeff Orlowski

Global warming tends to be a downer, no matter the medium. But if there's any such thing as the "right" way to deliver the message about climate change - a transcendent way, even - this is it. "The story," as photographer James Balog puts it, is definitely "in the ice." Director Jeff Orlowski follows Balog and his small crew through the craggy, arctic treacheries of Alaska, Iceland, and Greenland as they risk their lives to record the drastically changing faces of the world's most stunning - but nonetheless receding - glaciers. It doesn't always go well. They install dozens of time-lapse cameras specially engineered to withstand the world's harshest weather conditions, but they break all the same, Balog's bum knee threatens to retire him from his own project. But nearly four years later - knee surgeries and camera re-engineering behind them – the results are heart-in-your-throat breathtaking. 

Fresh off completing his 16-year *Paradise* Lost trilogy, documentarian Joe Berlinger

escapes with Paul Simon to South Africa, where the singer-songwriter celebrates the 25-year anniversary of his seminal album Graceland with a reunion concert and a reckoning. Using historical footage, present-day rehearsal scenes, and a longsimmering conversation between Simon and former Artists Against Apartheid founder Dali Tambo, Berlinger takes us back to the days when Simon's album was revered for its artistry even as its author was vilified for violating the UN's cultural boycott against South Africa. Simon comes off as a sort of musical savant, consumed both then and now with the process of artistic creation, yet oddly indifferent to the larger cultural concerns and political movements surrounding him. Under African Skies is both a joyous exploration of the creative act and an attempt at understanding the role of the artist in modern political life.

D: Kevin McManus, Matthew McManus; with Alex Maizus, Dylan Hartigan, Jordan Puzzo

It's not easy being 14, or at least not for Charlie (Maizus), who'll do seemingly anything to prove he's not "just a kid." At first, that just means stealing communion wine and devising elaborate ruses to snag porn from the local video store, pastimes afforded Charlie and his best friend, Andy (Hartigan) both altar boys – whenever there's a funeral, which allows them to cut class. But as Charlie grows increasingly disgruntled, the boys' penchant for mischief approaches mayhem. Funeral Kings is the first feature for brothers Kevin and Matthew McManus, who said they wanted to explore "what it's like to be 14 ... to have a lot more bark than bite." They build a genuine tension between that bark and bite while drawing moments of real comedy from their young stars. It also doesn't hurt that their command of the script's "ripe language" (in the parlance of the McManus brothers' aunt, a nun) rivals Glengarry Glen Ross.





Drawing a crowd of cold, wet fans on Saturday morning was a showcase that included Chioke Nassor's "Major/Minor: The TV on the Radio Tour Documentary," dedicated to bassist Gerard Smith, who died last April. Filmed in 2006, TVOTR members give a razor-sharp rundown of pet peeves: Internet album leaks, label pressure to cut song duration, and the inescapable "race question" from journalists. Austin filmmaker Ben Steinbauer's eponymous short "Brute Force" is about another musician beleaguered by the majors: Mr. Force never escaped the noveltyact ghetto after recording the F-bomb-laden single "King of Fuh" for Apple in 1967. Equally irreverent but more famous is the subject of "A Brief History of John Baldessari." Henry Joost and Ariel Schulman's film about the charismatic conceptual-art pioneer is zippy and unpretentious; narrator Tom Waits gives equal attention to Baldessari's major retrospective at the Met and Baldessari's wi-fi password. Other films in this smorgasbord of portraits pack an emotional punch: Caleb Slain's "It Ain't Over" is narrated by a man dying of - actually, living with - Lou Gehrig's CONTINUED ON P.54









From the Eyes of the Abused

'Wolf'

Given the high-profile sexual abuse scandal that's stained the Catholic Church, it's no surprise that it's the subject of numerous narrative features and documentaries. These films approach the subject in some now-familiar ways. There are those that focus on the brutality of the abuse, sometimes veering toward the lurid. The ghost of shame and secrecy drives others. And still others offer a revenge fantasy, wherein the abused boys (or girls), grown into adults, confront their abusers to seek (or mete out) justice. Ya'Ke Smith's Wolf starts with a similar premise but differs from its predecessors in several significant ways.

First, it features the Stevenses, a working-class, African-American family. A nondenominational Pentecostal church is at the

center of the family's spiritual life. Their home is not a show-place, but it's comfortable. Wife and mother Nona (Mikala Gibson) is finishing college while her husband, Jaymund (Shelton Jolivette), works as a truck driver. Their teenage son Carl (Jordan Cooper) is shy and sullen like many teenage boys his age, but when it comes time to attend church with his

mother, he does so without complaint. Familiar and comforting routines shape their days. When Carl's secret of abuse is revealed, the Stevenses are understandably destabilized. But instead of revisiting the well-worn territory of similarly themed films, Wolf turns its attention to the conflicting emotions that come when a young person discovers sexual intimacy and desire at too young an age. Candid without being sensational, Wolf manages to strike harsh notes with astonishing grace.

"I had to show the worst of the worst, and unfortunately, sometimes the abused grows so accustomed to his or her abuse that they desire the affections of their abuser. That's real," Smith said in a telephone interview from his office at the University of Texas at Arlington.

Smith is a San Antonio native who began making films while he was a student at Sam Houston High. He received his MFA in film-

making at the University of Texas at Austin and is now an assistant professor of film in the Department of Art and Art History at UT-Arlington. He's written, directed, and produced five critically recognized shorts, earning a Director's Guild of America Student Film Award, a regional Student Academy Award, and an HBO Short Film Award. His shorts have screened at film festivals all over the world, including the prestigious Cannes Film Festival, where his multi-award-winning short "Katrina's Son" screened in 2011.

While Smith has approached difficult subject matter in prior films, *Wolf* is his first full-length feature. "I was struck by the subject," he said. "I've seen a lot of documentaries and narratives about sexual abuse, but not from this vantage point." Smith's research included visiting online chat rooms where

anonymous adult male survivors of sexual abuse shared their stories.

"A lot of people are suffering. Many of them said they'd not told anyone what had happened to them outside the chat room. Many blamed themselves for their abuse because they did get aroused, and [they] experienced a huge void when their abuser left them," Smith said. "There are a lot of things that could have been filmed for shock value, but I was focused on the emotional impact on the boy, the family, and the pastor."

While the anonymity of the chat rooms made for deeply frank and emotional testimonials, Smith was further moved when he began a funding campaign for Wolf on Indiegogo. "I started to have people contact me on Facebook and tell me their story, thankful that the film was being made, grateful to have their story told."

If Wolf can get the subject of child sexual abuse at the hands of clergy talked about more openly, Smith is all for it. What he's not out to do is make a film that condemns the church.

"I'm a church boy. I grew up in the church. This is not a film about how the church is bad. It's saying that as long as these things are covered up, no one is going to be healed."

This program is a remarkable study of human needs. Our need to anthropomorphize, for instance - in Seth Keal's "CatCam," which won the Jury Award for best documentary short, a German-American overcomes his fear of feline intimacy by outfitting his tabby with a video-recording collar, then studying the cat's filmographic output. Josh Gibson's "Kudzu Vine" reflects on the moral virtues of a fastgrowing miracle plant some Georgia farmers speak to, and Matt Lenski's "Meaning of Robots" introduces us to model-builder Mike Sullivan, whose life ambition is to shoot a stop-motion porn epic about Catherine the Great starring mechanical robots. "They don't need to fuck, but they do it compulsively," he explains, blowing dust off the rusting automatons in his overflowing Manhattan studio. Likewise, creative catharsis can be found styling hair in a Scotland prison, as in Finlay Pretsell and Adrian McDowall's "Cutting Loose," or, in the case of Dustin Guy Defa's "Family Nightmare," dragging skeletons out of the closet. Defa distilled 40 hours of VHS home movies into 10 very disturbing minutes, then dubbed the voices of his relatives with his own slightly off lip-sync. Nervous titters from the audience cease when the end titles reveal how and when the subjects died. "Family Nightmare" is a surreal masterpiece. quickly when he wakes up, buried alive under a few inches of soil in the jungle. Fogged with amnesia, he must also find out who he is, where he is, and why a maniac with a machete and a crossbow is trying to kill him. In his first English-language feature, director Joko Anwar (The Forbidden Door) constructs a superior stalk-and-slash storyline as John flees for his life across a jungle he is sure he must know. Then Anwar mercilessly rips

through a third act switchback of necksnapping speed and severity. It's a full-blown David Lynch narrative meltdown, but it's Dewanto's tormented performance that keeps the audience strapped in when the gears strip. Watch for that tail: it's a killer.

She hovers over his belly, smiling, then gently, almost imperceptibly, strokes his skin with her silken curtain of hair. 24 Beats Per Second D: Lindsey Dryden

Lindsey Dryden's documentary Lost and Sound looks briefly into the lives of three people - a dancer who's been deaf since birth, a young pianist who lost her hearing as a baby, and a middle-aged music critic who's gone totally deaf in one ear - as they struggle, each to a lesser or greater extent, to deeply interact with the music that's so important to them. There is much well-shot footage here of the subjects going about their days, of the methods and technologies leveraged toward achieving (or recapturing) the perception of sound. These personal threads of narrative, shot as naturally as home movies, are interwoven with graphically enhanced commentary from audiologists and academics - and with beautiful, polychrome clouds-in-water sequences that attempt to replicate, visually, the often fluid and billowing architecture of music. Director Dryden is hearing-impaired, note, but neither deaf nor blind to what it takes to construct a fascinating documentary film. - Wayne Alan Brenner
