denies "research" brought by the industry to delay any threat to their profit (such as the case with adding lead to gasoline), as well as denying the general sense of alienation and detachment to life that puttering around in steel-glass carapaces brings.

Driving has fundamentally changed our cities and our psyches, which is why breaking this norm causes such seething hatred toward cyclists. Driving as a transportation system is built around delays; all that speed and power up a hill is a commercially orchestrated illusion, especially when everyone has to drive. Cyclists form easy targets of wrath in a world of semi-professional drivers on an open course to an idling hydrocarbon deadlock.

But questions of driving never really belonged to rational discussion; rather, emulation has always been one of the key factors in people's wholesale acceptance of designed obsolescence and conflation of status with evidence of conspicuous consumption. You drive that giant fucking "light" truck or "sport utility vehicle" because you've become convinced that you need such things to cart your ego around, because you consider it necessary for representation in an illusory middle class. The gulf between the most powerful and the rest of traffic-jammed humanity has become astronomical in its reckoning - and the powerful don't need such foul concepts as movement democracy mucking that about.

#### MEDIA, PA., BREAK-IN SHOCKING

While much of the information about the FBI's COINTELPRO program recounted in "The Facts Were



Immaterial" [News, June 7] were somewhat or very familiar to me, I was shocked that the event which brought the program down - the March 8, 1971, break-in of the FBI field office in Media, Pa., by the Citizens' Commission to Investigate the FBI - was wholly unfamiliar. Not only do I consider myself wellread in American history, I was born in Media in the late Sixties, grew up and lived the first 21 years of my life approximately two miles from the Media Courthouse, and even had a longtime school friend whose father, an FBI agent, undoubtedly spent a fair amount of time in the local Bureau office - and I had never heard of this story! Thank you for the history lesson and for shedding light on this dark era. It's amazing to think that little old Media - "Everybody's Hometown," as the borough's quaint nickname goes - may have had its own "Deep Throat" (or "Deep Throats") living amongst the rest of us.

Bicyclists get more attention than pedestrians. There are ghost bikes for cyclists killed on the street, but nothing for pedestrians. Motorists write angry letters about bicyclists. People on foot just get run over without fanfare.

We need a big sidewalk build-out. Construct one-tenth of the sidewalk plan in a year, and Oops!

In last week's Arts piece about restaurant design ("Emerging Foodscapes," June 14), the Chronicle erroneously stated that Frank occupies the same building that formerly housed the Bitter End. Our Food editor, Virginia B. Wood, sets the record straight: "The Bitter End was one of Austin's first brewpubs and was located in the 300 block of Colorado, across the street from Mezzaluna and what became Sullivan's Steakhouse. It burned to the ground, and the owner of the building declined to rebuild. The Austin Police **Department** made 50 no-refusal drunken driving arrests and **Austin-Travis County EMS** units responded to 21 biker-related accidents during the four-day fest. EMS reported just one onscene death, when a woman riding on the back of a motorcycle was thrown against a guardrail during an accident.
- In her first public appearance since her DWI conviction, Travis County District Attorney Rosemary **Lehmberg** spoke to Commissioners Court Tuesday, defending her office and its Public Integrity Unit, as commissioners considered whether to replace vetoed state funding.
- The Texas Civil Rights Project has sued Williamson County Commissioners on constitutional grounds, on behalf of a Burnet County deputy who was questioned about his views on politics, religion, abortion, and gay rights in an interview for a constable position.
- The rancorous legislative special session continues on as Republicans ramrod through conservative legislation. This week the Senate passed tough new abortion regulations, while the House Redistricting Committee took seven minutes to vote out gerrymandered voting maps. See p.16.
- **▶** The **U.S. Supreme Court** is expected to issue rulings on two cases with major implications for Texas on June 20: Fisher v. University of Texas, challenging UT's admissions policies, and Shelby County v. Holder, on the preclearance clause in Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act.
- The city has a new format for utility bills that lets customers make voluntary contributions to one or more of three categories: Customer Assistance Program, providing emergency aid for struggling ratepayers; Parks and Libraries (donations to be divided between the two), and Public School Energy Assistance program. Gone is the tree-planting fund option.

# In Defense of Women's Rights

#### THE GOP DOES BATTLE FOR A GOVERNMENT OF MEN. NOT LAWS

The spectacle of grown men (and it is mostly men) attempting to impose on the general public (in this instance, mostly women) their private notions of sexual and medical morality is not without occasional comedy. The Boob of The Week is Texas Congressman Michael Burgess, R-Lewisville, who informed a House committee considering an anti-abortion "fetal

pain" bill that the proposed 20-week gestation limit should be even earlier, because he claims to have seen sonograms of fetuses 15 weeks or earlier ... masturbating.

"If they're a male baby, they may have their hand between their legs," reported Burgess, who indeed was formerly an ob-gyn, and whose eyesight (or febrile imagination) must be truly remarkable. "If they feel pleasure, why is it so hard to believe that they could feel pain?"

That Burgess found it necessary to specify the gender of his fanciful fetuses - in the doc's feverish dreamworld, females would presumably be too demure to pleasure themselves, at least on camera - only reinforces the absurdity of his entirely unscientific assertion. "Fetal pain" is the latest anti-abortion invention to enable Republican lawmaking, and Burgess' peculiar form of sexist pseudo-science is a ridiculous but useful reminder that the attack on abortion rights is partly founded on willful ignorance of female sexuality. Burgess has

> never been the brightest bulb in Congress; indeed, earlier he led an idiotic struggle to

preserve our "right to choose" ... 100-watt lightbulbs. It's a mixed blessing that he gave up medicine for the House Tea Party Caucus - at least his former patients will no longer have an imbecile for a doctor.

Nevertheless, this week the House indeed passed its fetal pain bill, banning abortions after 20 weeks. It was a purely

symbolic exercise; the Senate will likely never consider the bill, let alone enact it, but the GOP-dominated House - having voted to "repeal" Obamacare several dozen times, to no effect - prefers playing political games to actually doing anything useful.

#### **Back to the Alleys**

Unintentional comedy in the halls of Congress often turns to manufactured tragedy in women's lives. Jordan Smith reported the testimony of Carole Metcalf ("Playing Games With Pain," Newsdesk, April 15), who told a Texas House committee that she learned only at the 20th week of gestation of the terminal and incurable illness of her fetus. Had a "fetal pain" law been in place in Texas, Metcalf would have been forced to carry the infant to term - in order to watch it die. Mandatory legislated time limits on medical procedures are not only ignorant but cruel; they impose abstract ideological standards on particular, personal matters of life and death, and in this context, they routinely and cynically value the life of a fetus above that of a mother.

On Tuesday, shortly after the U.S. House was enacting its fetal folly, the Texas Senate

was following Gov. Rick Perry's mandate that the special session reconsider antiabortion bills that couldn't be passed under regular session rules. For some reason - perhaps a twinge of conscience, but more likely for political expediency - Katy Sen. Glenn Hegar's SB 5 dropped the fetal pain provision to focus instead on procedural restrictions that would make it nearly impossible for most Texas women to access safe, legal abortions.

For make no mistake, abortions will persist in Texas, as they did in the years before Roe v. Wade. Texas women will simply be forced to find underground, illegal ways to receive the medical care that is theirs by natural and constitutional right. Wealthy women will do so easily, and privately, traveling outside Texas if necessary; less fortunate women will do so however they can, and many will die or be mutilated in the process.

#### The War Goes On

There are certainly significant numbers of people who truly oppose abortions on moral or religious grounds. They are free to campaign against it, and to try to persuade the rest of us - both an actual and legal majority – to their position. What they should not be free to do is impose their personal convictions on the entire community, especially in the guise of unnecessary and burdensome regulations that humiliate and injure women, and force doctors to practice politics instead of medicine.

I frankly have little patience for purported adults who insist there is no substantive difference between a first- or second-term fetus and a "baby." There is even less reason to indulge cynical politicians whose primary and transparent motivation is pandering to a fanatical minority of voters who would very cheerfully impose their personal religious beliefs on all their neighbors. We should not be governed by the values of the meanest and most censorious among us.

Abortion rights are women's rights, and abortion decisions are entirely a private matter belonging to a woman, her family, and her physician. The state has absolutely no business or right to interfere in those difficult decisions, and the party of "limited government" is supremely hypocritical on this subject. Given a chance to expand health care for women and Texans generally, the governor and Republicandominated Texas Legislature decided to pass the buck to the federal government and let millions of Texans do without. Now, they would even further restrict women's rights to legal health care. As Houston Sen. Rodney Ellis put it, "The war on women is apparently alive and well in Texas. Just days after Governor Perry vetoed legislation requiring equal pay for equal work for women, the Texas Senate has decided to dramatically decrease access to health care and harm Texas women. Texas women deserve better treatment than they are getting from their government."

# **Swimming Upstream**

#### FAMILIES' ACCESS TO CITY POOLS DEPENDS ON WHERE THEY LIVE

It's common knowledge that municipal swimming pools - once a neighborhood staple and valued community space in most towns - are always among the first to sink during economic downturns.

The worst part? Economic rebounds seldom result in reinvigorated funding for the facilities, which, as Jeff Wiltse writes in his 2010 book, Contested Waters, increasingly makes public pools at risk of extinction.

Austin's funding priorities have historically followed this pattern, with parks and recreation, along with libraries, taking the lion's share of the hits. Heather Way, an Austin lawver and affordable-housing advocate. decided to take a look at the current state of our municipal pools and found what she called a disconcerting racial and socioeconomic divide in public pool access. She posted her findings June 13 on her blog site, WhichWay (www.whichwayaustin.blogspot.com). "I hope that I am missing something in my data analysis ... and there really isn't such a stark divide between East and West Austin in terms of public pool access," wrote Way, who teaches at the UT law school

where she directs the Entrepreneurship and Community Development Clinic.

Sadly, she hadn't missed anything, although a Parks and Recreation Department staffer did weigh in with additional detail and noted that **Bartholomew** Pool in East Austin, where

the access disparity is greatest, is undergoing a major makeover and is due to reopen next summer.

Way cites a 2011 survey of U.S. cities by the Trust for Public Land, which ranked Austin at an impressive No. 11 for public pools per capita, or 4.5 municipal and neighborhood pools per 100,000 residents. But since that survey, Way says, Austin has

dropped behind on the list and risks dropping further as the city keeps growing. "When you tally up the public pools listed on the city's website," she writes, "we are down to 31 pools." That would put Austin at 3.6

public pools per capita, or No. 20 on the national list, she says.

Moreover, the swimming season for most families is as short as the summer break from school, with few recreational swimming opportunities available in May and September, when school is in session even as the temperature feels like summer. Worse still is that many municipal pools, particularly in East Austin, aren't open

for recreational swimming during the morning hours. A family in East Austin wanting to go to a pool at 10am, for example, has limited options because there's only one pool - Martin - open for recreational swimming at that hour, while families in South, West, and North Austin have access to five

pools within a short walking or driving distance from their homes.

Way received several emailed responses to her post (the blog's comment section is currently out of kilter). She shared some reader responses with me, and, with their permission, I'm sharing a couple here. Susana Almanza, a Parks and Rec board member and a leader of Eastside activist group **PODER** (People Organized in Defense of Earth and Her Resources), wrote, "Not only is there a lack of access, but there is a lack of swimming lessons. The only swimming lesson taught at East Austin pools is how not to drown." She says she plans to add the issue of pool disparity to the June 25 PARD board agenda.

Tom Nelson, manager of PARD's Aquatics Division, agreed with Way that Austin's growth rate is outpacing the city's ability to build new pools. "It is also important to note the average age of [the city's] swimming pools is over 40 years," he wrote. "Much of [PARD's] capital improvement project funding is spent to keep aging aquatic facilities operational and code compliant." He said PARD has submitted an "unmet service demand" request for additional funds to "normalize" pool hours across the city, providing equal access to city pools.

Way, a mother of two, says her time spent serving on the city's Families and Children Task Force helped form her interest in how Austin grows as a family-friendly city. "It made me view the city through a different lens in terms of the way our built environment and city resources have such an impact on the quality of life for families with kids."

Giving kids access to public pools and swimming lessons sounds like such a small thing, but, as Way says, public pools require more than just money. "If you live in an area where there's no access to public swimming pools, that has such a huge impact on children's health and well-being," she said. "This isn't so much a [PARD] issue so much as it is an overall political priority.'



# City Cuts Fee Waivers to Marriott Builder; **Labor Groups File Workplace Complaints**

After months of back and forth over the issue of how much the development corporation behind a new JW Marriott Hotel at Third and Congress should pay construction workers on the project, labor rights groups have stopped playing (relatively) nice. On June 14, the Workers Defense Project and the local chapter of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers unleashed a flood of wage and job-safety complaints against Indiana-based White Lodging Services Corp.

Hours later, city management informed White Lodging that the city was discontinuing its fee waivers associated with the project. The immediate issue for the city is over prevailing wages and how the firm can calculate them. More broadly, the debate features no small amount of confusion that, digested in nearly any way, could threaten the city's reputation for how it does business.

In June 2011, White Lodging agreed to pay prevailing wage to construction workers on the project as part of an economic incentives contract. In exchange, the city offered up some \$3.8 million in fee waivers. Shortly after Council action, White Lodging received an email from former Assistant City Manager Rudy Garza, telling them that they could use average construction pay to get their prevailing wage calculations - which allows for significant savings over paying prevailing wages to every worker, which is what WDP and others had understood was required under the contract.

Workers Defense got word of the discrepancy and began filing complaints early this



year. That prompted city Contract **Management Department** Director Rosie Truelove to send out a series of communications to White Lodging that eventually demanded that they pay back wages to 13 form carpenters on the job, with a June 4 deadline, in order to stay in compliance with the contract (see "Then There's This: White Lodging's Steal of a Deal," June 14). The conflict was furthered by what Truelove called

"an incomplete response" from the company when the city sought information that would allow it to go over the project books.

The simmering dispute came to a full boil on Friday, June 14. That morning, WDP's Greg Casar and IBEW's Philip Lawhon filed two more complaints over the wages paid to construction workers. Casar also filed complaints with the city's Code Compliance **Department** over inadequate rest breaks,

and with the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration about a lack of water on site.

And, that afternoon, Assistant City Manager Anthony Snipes sent a letter to White Lodging demanding a return of an undisclosed amount of fees already waived for the project and informing the developer that the city would cut off any future anticipated fee waivers.

That ruling produced a predictably sharp statement Monday from White Lodging. "On August 16, 2011, White Lodging received written confirmation from the City Manager's office that it will meet the city's prevailing wage requirement by adhering to specific wage rates identified in the written confirmation," said White Lodging President and CEO for Investments & Development Deno Yiankes. "White Lodging has and will continue to meet those requirements. The written confirmation from the city was the basis for White Lodging beginning construction on the hotel. Now, after construction has begun, the city has changed its mind on the written confirmation White Lodging received. We look forward to continuing the discussion and remain confident the city will honor its word and not engage in bait-and-switch tactics when it comes to economic development incentives."

The statement included a timeline of proceedings from White Lodging's perspective and repeated their conclusion that: "An analysis showed that the additional cost of strictly applying the public sector prevailing wage to a private project would exceed the incentive passed by council." Yiankes has asked City Council to put the item on an agenda as soon as possible to reconsider the city's position. It remains unclear whether or not this will happen. - Mike Kanin

# **Taco Tower Project on Council's Plate**

After about two months of postponements, the Taco PUD finally won a round last week.

Previously, the city's Environmental Board failed to recommend the environmental aspects of the proposed Planned Unit Development at 211 S. Lamar, currently occupied by a Taco Cabana, and the Waterfront Planning Advisory Board has rejected it outright. Additionally, Zilker and Bouldin Creek neighborhood associations, Save Town Lake, the Zach Theatre Board of Trustees' Executive Committee, and the adjacent Bridges on the Park Condominium Association have all taken a stand against the project.


Though the opposition was out in force at last week's Planning Commission meeting, commissioners nevertheless voted 5-3 to recommend a zoning change that would allow developers Post Paggi to increase the height of its planned condo project to 96-feet. Several commissioners took the time to argue that the added density at Riverside and Lamar was not only a good fit - it was exactly what the city needs, with an increase in population interested in living Downtown and a limited amount of space for people to live. Commissioners Danette Chimenti, Myron Smith, and Jean Stevens voted against the zoning change, and Chair Dave Anderson was absent.

At times, the project has functioned as a lightning rod for all of the developmental anxiety in the city - with the opposition targeting everything from an undue increase in traffic

to disruption of the lake's shoreline. Last month, a postponement was granted to opponents concerned about the impact on the historic Paggi House. And the case was at the heart of City Council's decision, at its previous meeting, to take a closer look at the affordable housing calculations for PUDs.

Developers note that, in exchange for the benefit of added height from the zoning change, they are offering a selection of community benefits that include saving trees, providing retail and restaurants on the ground floor, water quality controls, a public plaza, and space for a bike share program. Developers will also be required to provide a certain amount of affordable housing, or pay a \$430,000 fee in lieu to the city's affordable housing fund, though that determination will ultimately be up to Council.

At the Planning Commission meeting, condominium owners at the **Bridges on the Park**, who oppose the zoning change, said they were expecting a project on the lot, and were looking forward to what they anticipated would be a 60-foot tall building. Many expressed anger at what they saw as a false choice between a beautiful 96-foot tall building and an inferior 60-foot project. In a flourish, Bridges resident Jim Martino said they were being asked to choose between a "full-scale lunch for 20 and a peanut butter and jelly sandwich that had been left in a car for a week." He explained that they just wanted something in between.



When it came time for developer attorney Steve Drenner to speak, he seemed exasperated, saying the case was evidence that development is never easy in Austin. He detailed talks with the neighborhood association, which he knew would not result in support, an increasing list of requirements from the condominium association that was never satisfied, and the fruitless year-and-a-half spent waiting for the Waterfront Planning Advisory Board to finish an ordinance that could have allowed them to forgo the zoning case in the first place. Of course, that didn't happen, and City Council is currently scheduled to hear the case today, June 20.

# **Council Preview: What Can We Afford?**

That buzzing you hear may be the sound of looming helicopters; not the black variety of survivalist nightmares, but the more mundane variety charged with transporting bigshots across town - say, on their way to the next round of Formula One races - subject of one of the public hearings at City Council today, June 20. After a series of stakeholder meetings, city staff has drafted a new set of regs (Items 88-89) designed to make 'copters less intrusive on neighborhoods - 31 pages of limits on location, frequency, noise, etc. Whether that will be enough to quiet the buzz of opposition, we'll soon discover.

Waller Creek

Somewhat higher on the agenda (Item 15, on consent), and less likely to evoke opposition, is another potential tweaking of the new parental leave policy enacted at Council's last meeting. At Tuesday's work session, members explored whether the city can afford to expand the policy beyond its fairly limited definition (to employees

not governed by contract) and restrictive time frame (as currently designed, staffers would have to exhaust all other accrued leave before using the paid parental benefit).

Likely to cost a good deal more, at least in the long run, is the formal approval of the Waller Creek Project and its design plan, previewed again for Council during its last meeting. Items 21 and 23 would authorize the city manager to negotiate a joint development agreement with the Waller Creek Conservancy, and endorsed the elaborate Michael Van Valkenburgh Associates/Thomas Phifer design briefed on June 6.

The broader question of affordability is always in the air (this week's work session

featured yet another briefing on various ways the city is trying to promote affordable housing), and today's morning briefings will certainly touch on it: 1) a review of the sustainability aspects of the Colony Park Project in Northeast Austin, and 2) an update on the **Downtown Plan Density Bonus Program** the persistently embattled attempt to tie developer zoning changes to provision of affordable units. One concrete instance of the debate will be the return of the "Taco PUD" the proposed upscale planned unit development for 211 S. Lamar (currently the site of a Taco Cabana). There's considerable opposition

> from neighbors and from city boards, with "affordability" a simmering issue - but the rezoning has been recommended by staff and by the Planning Commission, often a trump card at Council (see "Taco Tower ... Project on Council's Plate," p.14). Expect a spirited hearing.

Beyond this summation, there are resolu-

tions from Council on transporting hazardous waste around the city (Item 55; SH 130 never looked so good) and another to join the process currently exploring a "cut and cap" below-ground reconstruction of I-35 through Downtown – someday you (or your offspring) might be able to cross the freeway on foot without drafting a new will.

The band of the day is Latin fusionists Este Vato; proclamations include World Refugee Day, Love Your Rescue Pet Day, and Wal-Mart – for its Charitable Giving and Hunger Relief programs. Next step: persuading Wal-Mart to pay its employees sufficiently so that they do not require charitable giving and hunger relief programs. - Michael King

# **Perry's Vexing Vetoes**

The legislative special session rumbles on, but last Friday, Gov. Rick Perry racked up a few more enemies by signing the last of his vetoes for the regular session.

With the veto deadline passing June 16, the body count of dead bills stands at 26, plus line-item vetoes on both the 2014-2015 biennial budget in Senate Bill 1, and the supplemental appropriations in House Bill 1025. While the Legislature could theoretically override Perry's veto by a two-thirds majority in both chambers, as Speaker Joe Straus informed his House colleagues, that's never happened.

Many of Perry's kills appear to be outright political pandering: for example, HB 950, the Texas version of the federal Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. Senate sponsor Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, wrote, "By vetoing the equal pay for equal work bill, [Perry] shows a callous disregard for wages required to support Texas families." Some are more inexplicable. HB 217 would have barred public schools from providing sodas and sugary drinks to students. In committee, it was supported by a broad coalition of health care advocates, including the Texas Pediatric Society and the American Heart

Association, and even the Texas Beverage

Association. Only the Texas Conservative

Coalition spoke in opposition. Perry dis-

missed it, saying it went to an "unreason-

able and unnecessary extreme" - in part

because it banned 2% reduced fat milk.

The single biggest legislative loser was Sen. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, who lost three bills - two as author, one as sponsor. Perry had already vetoed Seliger's SB 346, placing new campaign finance reporting requirements on politically active nonprofits. That was one of two measures he vetoed back during the regular session (see "There They Go ... Here They Come Again," May 31), and he followed that up on June 14 by killing HB 3509. That rarest of treasures - a Republican-authored environmental bill would have reorganized how the state deals with federal endangered species listings.

> Calling it a defense against overuse of the Endangered Species Act,

> > Senate sponsor Seliger said he was "disappointed that the Governor has decided

to veto an agreed-to bill that many people, including members of his own staff, helped negotiate."

By contrast, the Travis County delegation was mostly spared Perry's savage pen. The one exception was Sen. Judith Zaffirini, the Laredo Democrat whose Valley district has now been gerrymandered

to reach into East Austin. She lost two bills, including a measure on tax lien law sponsored in the House by her fellow Democrat, outgoing Austin Rep. Mark Strama.

There was a local impact to one of Seliger's lost measures. SB 15 was tailored to block the alleged witch hunt by Perryappointed University of Texas regents against UT Austin President Bill Powers by limiting their powers to remove school lead-



ership. The Texas Coalition for Excellence in Higher Education savaged Perry's decision as protecting his brand of cronyism, issuing a statement saying, "This veto will enable the continued destruction of some of our leading institutions by the very people who are charged with strengthening and improving them."

However, the biggest furor centers on Perry's decision to make good on his threat to terminate funding in SB 1 for the Public **Integrity Unit** of the Travis County District Attorney's office. During a parliamentary inquiry June 17, Rep. Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, sought clarification from Speaker Joe Straus about how it would

affect the 400 pending criminal cases and the fate of its employees. Straus had no specifics, but told Turner that this was "an excellent question." Perry has claimed that he is simply showing a lack of faith in the leadership of Travis County D.A. Rosemary Lehmberg since her DWI conviction (see "What Happens Next?" May 3.) However, Turner placed Perry's veto in a historical context: Since 2003, there have been repeated attempts to either defund or disband the sole statewide prosecutor of malfeasance by elected officials. In that time, the Houston Democrat said, "This Legislature has resisted every attempt to abolish the Public Integrity Unit." - Richard Whittaker

SB 1 (Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands) Line-item budget veto including funding for Public Integrity Unit and aquifer research in Houston.

SB 15 (Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo) Limiting the power of public university regents to remove school presidents: commonly nicknamed the "Protect Bill Powers bill."

SB 17 (Dan Patrick, R-Houston) Allows school staff at districts and charters with no security personnel to participate in DPS school safety training. Perry vetoed it for not going as far as other legislation.

SB 219 (Joan Huffman, R-Houston) The Texas Ethics Commission Sunset bill. Unlike other agencies, the commission does not dissolve without passage of a Sunset bill. However, Perry vetoed several significant

SB 227 (Williams) Allowing doctors and opticians to directly dispense topical medicines for skin pigmentation disorders.

SB 346 (Seliger) Requiring politically active 501(c)(4) and 501(c)(6) groups to file campaign finance reports.

SB 429 (Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound) Allowing a judge to consider all preexisting court orders, including child support and visitation issues, before dismissing a child protective services case.

SB 504 (Bob Deuell, R-Greenville) Allowing school districts to opt out of detection programs for abnormal spinal curvature.

SB 722 (Rodney Ellis, D-Houston) Removing the requirement that an election's interpreter live within the relevant county.

SB 889 (Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio) Increasing the size of the Physician Assistant Board from nine to 13 by adding seats for four extra practicing PAs.

SB 1234 (John Whitmire, D-Houston) Truancy reforms: allowing former students to dismiss a truancy complaint if they provide either a high school or high school equivalency diploma by age 21.

SB 1606 (Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo) Allowing a taxing entity to apply a **lien** even if the property in question is outside its jurisdiction.

HB 217 (Carol Alvarado, D-Houston) No sodas in school: public schools to offer only unsweetened water, 1% milk or a substitute, or fruit or vegetable juice.

HB 535 (Yvonne Davis, D-Dallas) The "Made in America" bill, requiring state agencies to promote goods manufactured in Texas and to buy U.S.manufactured goods.

HB 950 (Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston) The Texas version of the federal Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009, clamping down on wage discrimination and increasing the window to file discrimination suits.

HB 1025 (Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie) Most of Perry's line-item vetoes on this supplemental appropriation remove riders for bills that never passed, but he did cut out \$5 million in university construction and special project cash.

HB 1090 (Armando Martinez, D-Weslaco) Establishing a disaster response search and rescue team for the Rio Grande Valley, and codifying an existing one in Dallas County.

HB 1160 (Charlie Geren, R-River Oaks) Allowing municipalities to take over as sole utility provider in a newly annexed territory.

HB 1511 (Lyle Larson, R-San Antonio) Raising the cap for the combined sales and use tax rates set by municipalities.

HB 1790 (Oscar Longoria, D-Mission) Allowing certain state jail **felony** convictions to be reduced to a Class A misdemeanor conviction on a defendant's record on completion of community supervision.

HB 1982 (Jim Murphy, R-Houston ) Allowing municipalities to apply for Texas Enterprise Zone funding for a commercial project, even if the company in question is situated in extraterritorial jurisdiction.

HB 2138 (Harold Dutton Jr., D-Houston) Expanding the area of the Near Northside Management District, an economic development tool in Houston founded by the Legislature in 2011.

HB 2590 (Jim Keffer, R-Granbury) Clarifying the rights and responsibilities of property owners and oil, gas, or mineral lease holders during

HB 2824 (Bennett Ratliff, R-Carrollton) Allowing the 20 districts in the Texas High Performance Schools Consortium to reduce the number of tests for grades 3-8.

HB 2836 (Ratliff) A major overhaul of benchmark tests for statewide assessment tests, including new requirements for an independent third party to review the effectiveness of testing at grades 3-8.

HB 3063 (José Menéndez, D-San Antonio) Allowing defense base **development** authorities to become reinvestment zones, stimulating job creation and capital investment through tax incentives.

HB 3085 (Armando Walle, D-Houston) Tougher regulation of junkyards in Harris County, with increased fines for violators.

HB 3509 (Dennis Bonnen, R-Angleton) Moving the process for how the state implements federal endangered species listings out of the Comptroller's Office: surprisingly for the notoriously conservative Bonnen, a measure backed by environmentalists.

# **Redistricting Maps Head to House**

Seven minutes. That's how long the June 18 meeting of the House Redistricting Committee took to vote out House, Senate, and Congressional redistricting maps.

The Republicans on the committee did the bidding of Gov. Rick Perry, who had called the session to adopt the interim maps drawn by the San Antonio courts in 2011 (see "There They Go ... Here They Come Again," May 31.) As a result, the committee split 11-5 on party lines on two of the maps: the House maps in Senate Bill 3, and the Congressional boundaries in SB 4. There was more agreement on SB 2, the court-drawn state Senate maps, which passed 15-1.

The committee had met with less unanimity the day before to discuss the identical House-written counterpart bills. Both committee Vice Chair Yvonne Davis, D-Dallas, and Rep. Trey Martinez Fischer, D-San Antonio, offered substantive amendments to the state rep maps in HB 3, to no avail. However, Committee Chairman Drew Darby called the final vote when only 14 members of the committee were present. As it only passed 9-5, and not with the 10 votes required to move forward, HB 3 died.

So the committee reconvened June 18 for a second try, this time moving forward with the Senate versions. However, Rep. Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston, raised a point of order on SB 3, highlighting what she saw as an attempt by Rep. Darby to end-run the parliamentary process. Thompson argued that the Legislature's rules about mirroring the substance of one bill in another meant the



failure of HB 3 and should have scuppered the identical Senate plan. "If a bill fails in committee," Thompson said, "then it is a bill that is dead and the subject matter is not to be duplicated in other bills." Yet Darby overruled her, and now all three maps head to the House, where they are expected to face a vote today, Thursday, June 20.

That's the same day the **U.S. Supreme** Court is expected to rule in Shelby v. Holder, a case that could determine the future of Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act. The fate of that legislation, which requires states including Texas to have electoral maps precleared by the U.S. Department of Justice, could be a key determinant of the nature of any future legal challenges. But however that decision goes, it seems highly likely that the maps passed this week will see more days in court: Even the judges who originally drew them called them imperfect. - Richard Whittaker



# **Texas Poised to Hit** 500th Execution

With the execution of Kimberly McCarthy slated for June 26, Texas is on the eve of a historic first: The first state to have executed 500 individuals since reinstatement of the death penalty - an event that also extends Gov. Rick Perry's record as the U.S. governor presiding over the most executions ever carried out. McCarthy is slated not only to be tagged with the infamous fate of 500, but will also become only

the fifth woman - and the third black woman - executed in Texas since 1854.

McCarthy, who was previously married to New Black Panther Party founder Aaron Michaels, was sentenced to die for the 1997 robbery-murder of her 71-year-old neighbor, retired professor Dorothy Booth. According to the state, McCarthy's crack cocaine addiction led her to employ a ruse – she needed to borrow sugar, she told Booth - in order to get into Booth's house. Booth was repeatedly stabbed, and her finger, with ring on it, was cut off. Booth's car and

credit cards were also stolen; McCarthy told police she pawned the items to get money

McCarthy was first slated to be executed in January, but that date with death was halted by a Dallas County judge in order to consider a claim that minority potential jurors were improperly struck by prosecutors from serving in McCarthy's trial (it was actually her second trial: her initial 1998 conviction was overturned after the courts found that the state improperly included into evidence a statement McCarthy made to police after she had "unambiguously" invoked her right to counsel). In a letter to Dallas County District Attorney Craig Watkins, McCarthy's attorney Maurie Levin pointed out that at the time of McCarthy's trial racial discrimination "pervaded" the county's jury selection process. Levin also noted that Watkins had told The Dallas Morning News that he would advocate during the recently concluded 83rd Legislature for passage of the Texas Racial Justice Act, which would allow death row inmates to appeal based on

> claims that racism played a role in their conviction.

> McCarthy's execution was postponed until April 3 and then again, to June 26, on Watkins' request, in order to afford the Legislature time to consider whether to pass a racial justice law - either Dallas Sen. Royce West's Senate Bill 1270 or Houston Rep. Senfronia Thompson's House Bill 2458. Neither bill was successful. Thompson's bill received a hearing in the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, but was not called up for a vote; West's measure wasn't even given a hearing. Those

bills were fashioned after the landmark Racial Justice Act passed by North Carolina; in early June, the Republican-led legislature there repealed the RJA.

Nonetheless, litigation is expected to continue as McCarthy's date draws nearer. Indeed, an appeal filed June 18 again raises claims related to racial bias. A separate filed motion seeks also to recuse CCA Presiding Judge Sharon Keller and Judge Michael Keasler from considering McCarthy's appeals based on the fact that both judges once served as prosecutors in Dallas where McCarthy's case - and racial bias claims – originated. - Jordan Smith



# The Mad Men: Senate Votes to Impose New Abortion Limits

Women dressed in *Mad Men*-era garb and dozens of women's rights supporters wearing bright orange T-shirts that read "My Family Values Women" gathered in the state

Senate chamber last week for a committee hearing on a quartet of measures that opponents say are designed solely to restrict access to abortion and to drive backward in time women's reproductive rights. On Tuesday afternoon, the Mad Men contingent returned, to watch Senators a debate until nearly midnight – and then pass, on a 20-10 vote (with Brownsville Democrat Eddie Lucio join- = ing 19 Republicans) - the bulk of those measures over to the House, just a week before the special-called session is scheduled to end.

Thanks to Gov. Rick Perry's adding abortion regulations to the session's call, four divisive measures that failed to pass during the regular session have been revived as Senate Bill 5, which would 1) require all abortion clinics to be held to the same standards as ambulatory surgical centers; 2) require all abortion

doctors to have hospital-admitting privileges within 30 miles of every clinic where they practice; and 3) require two in-person visits with a doctor for women seeking medical abortion. Originally, SB 5 would have

banned abortion at 20 weeks gestation (the so-called "Pre-Born Fetal Pain Bill"); that provision was withdrawn by its author, Sen. Glenn Hegar, R-Katy.

Although there are a handful of bills filed that address each matter separately, Hegar filed the omnibus SB 5 to incorporate each entry on the right-to-life wish list. But when the Senate gathered to debate - beginning at 5:30pm Tuesday evening - the bill had been mysteriously revised to exclude the 20-week ban.

Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, questioned Hegar about the last-minute decision to pull the controversial ban. "A large number of us are kind of mystified" about the lastminute change, he said. Would it be fair to say, then, Whitmire asked, that Hegar was "actually compromising [his] position on this issue for political expediency?" Not so, Hegar replied. Whitmire asked how it made sense to debate a new version of the bill without opportunity to review the substitute with

constituents or experts. The issues aren't new, Hegar countered, and have been raised throughout the session. - Jordan Smith

# **EUC Trio to Council: Take This Volunteer Job and Shove It**

Those of you hoping for more drama in the long-running Austin Energy saga got your wish Monday night when three of the seven sitting Electric Utility Commissioner members up and quit from the dais. The trio - Phillip Schmandt, Stephen Smaha, and Michael Webber (appointees of Council Members Chris Riley, Sheryl Cole, and **Bill Spelman**, respectively) – had been visibly disappointed with both Council and city management over the past few months. Their resignations punctuated what has

been a remarkably difficult time for the utility.

Commission Chair

Bernie Bernfeld referred to the trio more than once as the three musketeers, a nod to their frequent work together. Recently, those efforts found them part of a solid majority calling on

Council members to create a strong, independent governing board for the utility. Last month, Schmandt and Smaha teamed up on a plateful of resolutions over such issues as the shuttering of the **Fayette coal power** plant, utility hedging policies, and - believe it or not – the commissioners' right to retreat to the comforts of executive session, where, informed by sensitive information, they would be able to better weigh utility issues.

In remarks to online city hall newsletter In Fact Daily, Schmandt and Webber each indicated that their concerns for the utility went

unheeded. "[I]t's not even that we're not contributing in a positive way. It feels like sometimes we're making things worse, or what we consider to be good direction is completely ignored," said Webber.

Schmandt was more direct. "I do think there are some fundamental flaws in the system. It really is broken," he offered, citing general fund transfers to pay for unrelated city expenses. "It's a chain of command issue that when the city manager tells staff to include general expenses [and to] pick up

> those expenses on behalf of Austin Energy, staff can't say no, and that's just a real problem that has to get fixed." Smaha was the only one of the three to unload verbally from the dais. "I'm actually thankful to staff for making my experience

overall quite a good one," he began before turning dark. "On occasion over the last six years I've felt like the EUC has been able to have some impact on either the utility or the political process, but I don't feel that has been happening quite enough lately that it would warrant staying here."

Now three new commissioners will have to find their way through a complicated mess of utility policy and politics. It is doubtful that any of the drama surrounding the utility will be resolved by the time they take their seats.

#### THE CLASS OF 2013 SEEMS TO GET IT

Harrell's Hardware, located near my home in Austin, Texas, is the opposite of a big-box chain store. It's an unchained, smallbox store with a knowledgeable staff willing to help customers figure out how to do most any project. Harrell's slogan is: "Together, we can do it vourself."

I borrowed that rich concept for a **commencement speech** I recently laid on high school graduates in my hometown of Denison, Texas, Like most commencement droners, I urged the bright kids in funny square hats to do "big things" in life. But my message was

that bigness cannot be measured in terms of personal wealth and self-aggrandizement, even though such narcissism is the ethic being preached and practiced by today's corporate and political elite.

Rather, only by joining with others in democratic actions can any of us achieve something bigger than ourselves - something for the betterment of the whole community. As

Bill Moyers noted in an earlier speech, "Civilization is not just 'what happens'; it is what we make happen." The key word there is "we," for no "I" is big enough to do the job. But together, as Harrell's hardware says, "we can do it."

> The proof of this was sitting right in front of me at the graduation ceremonies. When I was in their place in 1961, every single person in my class and the audience was a white Anglo. Our schools and town were totally segregated. On this night, though, the ceremony was a glory of Anglo, African,

Latino, Arab, Asian, and other ancestries.

Denison became a better, more civilized place only because so many people (including some of the gray heads in this audience) had dared to stand together to make it happen. The class of 2013 applauded this ethic of social progress - and they gave me hope, that we can pull our country together again, e pluribus unum.





# Range War at the Dobie Ranch

A bulldozer's intrusion onto 'enchanted' property uncovers the struggles of UT's historic retreat for writers

The morning after a rainstorm, the sun shines down on a clearing dotted with wildflowers. Red-and-gold Indian blankets and top-heavy Mexican hats bob in the breeze among blackfoot daisies. It would look like any other patch of Hill Country wildland, if it weren't for the conspicuous lack of trees.

Look a little closer, and you can see jagged stumps of cedar and scrub oak jutting up through the wildflowers, some forming clusters almost four feet in diameter. Alongside the clearing, iron fencing has replaced several hundred feet of the gnarled cedar and barbed wire that borders the historic, University of Texas-owned Dobie Paisano Ranch, home to a prestigious fellowship program for Texas writers. On the south side of the black bars lies a razed, treeless patch of land over an acre in size belonging to the ranch; on the other, a smooth, emerald-green lawn in the Spanish Oaks golf course community, crowned with a mansion and hot tub. On the ranch side, bulldozer ruts crisscross the ground, permanently muddied by water dribbling from a drainage pipe near the fence. This water seepage, which no doubt has encouraged the wildflowers to grow, has also, in six short months, already started to erode the field on its downhill path straight into a Barton Creek tributary.

Michael Adams, director of the Dobie Paisano Fellowship Program, first saw the damage last Christmas. He points to bulldozer ruts that run between two black iron gates opening directly onto the University's property. The position of the ruts shows that the trespassing and property damage happened after the fence was built, suggesting no confusion over boundary lines; bulldozers had to drive through a gate in order to do the damage. "Devastation," Adams calls it. "We're being encroached upon and violated."

#### **UT Slow to Respond**

Almost as disturbing as the initial trespassing has been the slow response time on the part of UT officials, who were first apprised of the damage almost six months ago and have yet to determine how or whether to respond with legal action.

Adams first alerted the UT Campus Real Estate Office (CREO) to the destruction on Jan. 2. In February, when no reports had been filed with the police, no charges

pressed, and no survey of the damage made by the university, Adams personally brought the matter to the attention of the UT Office of Legal Affairs. The university finally scheduled a survey to determine the location of the property line for June 1, almost five months to the day after the incident was first reported. When asked why it took that long merely to determine the location of the ranch's property line in order to verify the trespass, a UT spokesperson said, "It's a process that can take time."

For writers who have lived and worked at the ranch, every moment UT delays its response is crucial. Adams soon began to receive a deluge of emails from former Dobie Paisano fellows. "They said things like, 'If somebody tore down the fence at the football field and sawed off their goalpost, if 30 yards of the football stadium were devastated, what would UT have done about it six months later?""

In mid-June, results from the survey were finally in, confirmed by local surveying group Terra Firma: 1.25 acres of ranch land belonging to the university had been cleared without permission. For Adams, who initially received multiple email apologies from the suspected offender for the intrusion, these results only confirm "what we already knew." Moreover, given that it has taken almost half a year of continuous effort on his part for UT to confirm that the incident even took place, he is not optimistic that the matter will be resolved quickly or in accordance with the best interests of the fellowship program. For the ranch itself, whose fragile ecosystem has taken a serious blow, the damage is done, and with the legal gears just now grinding into action, any assistance in restoring the land will be a long time coming.

A UT spokesperson has stated, "In general, the university first seeks to resolve disputes directly with the other party and then considers other options."





#### It Used to Be Secluded

The high-end real estate development Spanish Oaks, with its sprawling, cliffside houses and glittering golf course, has been increasing its presence in Central Texas since it was formed by CEO Daniel Porter in 1998. Although the developers took a hit in decreased sales during the mortgage crisis of 2008 and 2009, losing the land in a 2010 foreclosure, Porter was able to recover the property six months later. The development's mission, according to its website, is to "capture and preserve the natural environmental beauty of the land."

Although UT CREO contacted Spanish Oaks Development Manager Scott Michaels in early 2013, Michaels says that an assessment of the property conducted at the time convinced him no damage had been done. Michaels now attributes this to a miscommunication on the part of CREO over the location of the damage. "I went down there and walked the fence and didn't see anything. I thought, they must have told me the wrong piece of land." No follow-up attempts were made by either Spanish Oaks or UT to assess the situation. When contacted by the Chronicle, Porter, who had no prior knowledge of the incident, expressed concern, saying that the damage appears to have been the result of trespassing. "What appears to have happened is totally wrong," he said.

James Lorenz, the property owner whose Spanish Oaks lot abuts Dobie Paisano Ranch at the site of the damage, did not respond to the Chronicle's attempts to contact him. Although he initially acknowledged the intrusion in emails to Adams and offered to cooperate, Lorenz did not respond to UT lawyers who contacted him in March. According to Adams, in their single meeting at the property line, Lorenz joked that he had "done the ranch a favor" by clearing unwanted cedar. Adams, who has personally spent hours carefully clearing cedar as part of an elaborate ranch management plan he commissioned, was not amused. The razed area had been set aside for a trail to be named after Texas preservationist J. David Bamberger, who provided the management plan for the ranch.

In March, while waiting for word from the UT lawyers Adams purchased an orange "No Trespassing" sign and hung it on one of the few trees left in the clearing. Lorenz requested that he take the sign down because its reflective glow at night was disrupting the view.


#### One Man's Dedication

Adams, a 67-year-old professor of English at UT and associate director of the James A. Michener Center for Writers, has won multiple teaching awards in his 30-plus years teaching undergraduates. Growing up in Killeen, he spent much of his childhood

fishing and hunting on his grandfather's farm in Copperas Cove. While he looks supremely comfortable hiking up the bluff on Dobie Paisano's rugged, cedar-and-cactus-strewn land, he occasionally walks with a blue aluminum cane. He was carrying the cane when he met me for coffee, having recently mowed the lawn around the Dobie Paisano ranch house. "My hip and back are acting up," he confessed.

When Adams took over as director of the Dobie Paisano Fellowship Program six years ago, it was one of the best-kept secrets in the local creative writing scene. The 250acre ranch, located 20 minutes outside of Austin in the southwest hills, originally belonged to Texas folklorist J. Frank Dobie, who used its modest ranch house as a peaceful workplace and retreat. After Dobie's death in 1964, it was rescued from the auction block by Ralph A. Johnston, and a residency program for Texas authors and authors writing about Texas was established there with joint funding from the UT Graduate School and the Texas Institute of Letters, Recipients of the Dobie Paisano Fellowship live in the ranch house for four to six months, receiving a monthly stipend to allow them to work on long projects.

Since its inception in 1967, the fellowship program has hosted a succession of distinguished writers, including Sandra Cisneros, Dagoberto Gilb, and Gary Cartwright. But by 2007, the land had fallen into disrepair. It was overrun by cedar and posed a serious wildfire threat. The twomile road to the ranch house was crowded with overhanging trees to the point that it was barely passable, and low-water crossings regularly stranded fellows during rains. Moreover, the house itself was in grave disrepair, with fetid furniture, sagging ceilings, and an out-of-control termite problem. "The posts holding up the veranda were rotten and breaking off," Adams says. "The place was literally falling down."

Hired to read applications and administer a fellowship program, Adams soon found himself stepping into the roles of caretaker and fundraiser. With support from Victoria Rodriguez, then dean of the graduate school, Adams began planning a 40th anniversary celebration on the ranch. A safety assessment by UT Project Management and Construction Services resulted in the immediate condemnation and teardown of a shed on the property where former fellows like photographer Alan Pogue and writer Stephen Harrigan had worked, and UT project managers told Adams that the house itself was in bad enough condition to be condemned within a matter of years. Adams began raising money for a renovation. With generous support from recently deceased Texas Book Festival co-founder Mary Margaret Farabee, the ranch house got a full makeover, expanding its footprint, providing a modern, usable kitchen, and restoring interior walls to reveal the house's original,

to Ben Fountain, who won the National Book Critics Circle Award for his 2012 debut novel Billy Lynn's Long Halftime Walk.

#### **Manage**, Not Damage

In 2010, Adams commissioned a ranch management plan from Bamberger, whose 5,500-acre Selah Bamberger Ranch Preserve in Johnson City is the largest preservation project on private property in Texas. Bamberger spent a year walking every inch of the Dobie property, meticulously cataloging its plants and wildlife, assessing the soil, and marking out the best places for potential walking trails. Bamberger helped Adams rally the support of the Texas Trail Tamers, a group of wilderness volunteers who donated an estimated \$20,000 worth of services clearing trails along the top of the bluff and along the creek to "Philosopher's Rock," one of Frank Dobie's favorite resting places.

The trails blazed over a year ago are get-

sixties, emptied giant bags of wood chips into the deep gashes, laying long boards over the chips. Running out of boards, he stood over them, shaking his head. "I didn't bring enough," he said. "But maybe that will hold for a little while."

#### **DIY Maintenance**

Adams is quick to emphasize that the university has not been neglectful - rather, he says, it is unequipped to deal with the special needs of running a ranch. For example, there's the sticker problem. "The lawn around the ranch house is 54,000 square feet of stickers," Adams says, rendering it unusable for residents like Packer and her young children. This year Adams raised \$700 to buy corn gluten, which kills stickers. The treated lawn, however, needs frequent mowing and bagging to keep the seed heads at bay. Even if UT could send out a crew to mow the lawn weekly, their riding mowers do not bag the cut grass. So Adams himself mows the lawn with a walking lawnmower.

"It's not that we don't get any support," he says. "But when debris builds up at the low-water crossings, or even when a lightbulb has to be replaced, when the heater breaks - somebody has to get out there with blankets. Every time I have to put in a work order, it could take days to get someone out there." Those work orders can lag even longer during key UT times like graduation, which this year unfortunately coincided with a particularly rainy May, exacerbating the road problems Adams has tried to address with mulch and boards.

While the challenges of regular maintenance might be understandable, the university's response to the recent property damage has also been underwhelming. In a meeting with the CREO in April, the need for a land survey to establish the property line was brought up. The next day, Adams received an email request for \$3,800 for the survey, with a follow-up asking for an account number for the transfer. UT has stated that Adams was never asked to pay for the survey

historic log cabin design. Comfortable furniture and artwork donated by past Dobie fellows completed the restoration.

In addition to renovating the ranch house, Adams revamped the structure of the fellowship program, splitting the fellowship into separate grants for early-career and more established authors. Hoping to attract a broad range of high-profile writers to the program, he raised money to increase the stipend for both fellowships. The makeover worked. Recent Dobie Paisano fellows have included ZZ Packer and Philipp Meyer - both listed in the New Yorker's annual "20 under 40" author list - as well as award-winning novelists Stefan Block and Sarah Bird. Last year, applications started coming in from around the globe, and this fall the ranch will be home ting overgrown, however. While the ranch is serviced by the overworked UT maintenance crews, there are no special provisions for the care and upkeep of trails and country roads. With no one else looking after day-to-day issues on the ranch, Adams improvises solutions. When I visited the ranch with Adams, his SUV was cluttered with lumber and wood chips that he had purchased as a stopgap measure to fill in large ruts that had opened up on the ranch road. After the rainstorm the night before, he was worried about Packer, who currently lives on the ranch with her two sons. "She has to get her car in and out of the ranch every day to drive them to school," he said. "If a tire slipped into one of these gullies, she'd be in trouble." Adams, a man in his

with funds he had raised for the program, and Adams concedes that the request may have been the result of administrative confusion over which department oversees the program. Regardless, the survey was not granted at the time, although Adams forwarded the request to the UT Graduate School, which eventually paid for it.

To date, there has been no estimate of the cost of the damage to the university's historic property. Even Bamberger, as an experienced ranch preservationist, is hesitant to assign a dollar amount to the damage. "There's no way to repair it," he says. "Even if you could somehow replant everything. it'd take 50 years to grow back. You can win in court all you want, but it won't bring back a tree."

#### **Resignation Rejected**

Bringing the issue to UT Legal Affairs in February 2013 initiated a series of conversations that appeared to result in no real action. Adams became increasingly frustrated, and the talks went sour as he began to feel that advocating for the program he had rebuilt from the ground up made him the enemy.

Adams remembers one meeting shortly after UT Campus lawyers told him that the matter was getting passed to UT System lawyers. Desperate, Adams asked point-blank, "If we confirm with a survey that it's trespassing, is it still possible that the System lawyers will do nothing?' When they said yes, that was a turning point for me." Although Adams did not want to give details, he admits that his frustration with the lawyers was compounded by past incidents of trespassing and property damage that he felt had not been adequately addressed.

On May 9. Adams handed in his resignation as director of the Dobie Paisano Fellowship program to Graduate School Dean Judith Langlois. Delivering a lecture in his popular "In Search of Meaning" class, Adams had found himself distracted and upset by constant thoughts of the debates he was having with the university lawyers over the ranch. But Langlois, whom Adams calls "very supportive," refused to accept his resignation, instead reassuring him that she supported his efforts and that he would no longer have to be included in the frustrating meetings with lawyers. (Langlois declined to comment, referring the Chronicle instead to UT's public relations representative.)

#### A Writer's Place


Meanwhile, on the ranch, the writing life goes on. Current resident ZZ Packer, showing me around the house while occasionally running after her two playful children, testified to the importance of the fellowship program for her work. The ability to bring her family to the ranch was crucial for Packer, who is a single mother, but for her, it is only one of the things that separates Dobie from other residential writing programs. Packer points to the program's rootedness in the landscape, and, because of its connection to Frank Dobie, with the history of Texas itself. "You become a part of the place," she said. "You see these panoramic views, the land, the trees and streams. In one weekend, I absolutely fell in love. I've been all over Texas, but the Hill Country to me is some of the prettiest country." Nestled in the midst of this country, the ranch exposes awardwinning authors writing about Texas to what Adams calls "the authentic Texas landscape," as opposed to "a magazine view of what they think beautiful Texas should look like."

Philipp Meyer, whose sweeping Texas epic *The Son* was published May 28, calls the ranch "enchanted," and says it was crucial to his work on the novel. Longtime *Texas Monthly* writer Stephen Harrigan, a former fellow and recent recipient of the James Fenimore Cooper Prize for historical fiction, who now sits on the board of the Texas Institute of Letters, agrees. Harrigan remembers his time at the ranch as a lifechanging experience, the first time he was able to focus all his attention on his work. "This is an enchanted place," he says. "The more people know about it, the more they'll want to preserve it."



**Bethany Johnson** 

IN A SHARPLY DIVIDED TWO-ROOM STUDIO, BETHANY JOHNSON SLOWLY **WORKS HERSELF OUT OF A RUT** 

"I remember in college leafing through an Artforum and not feeling too excited about anything," recalls Bethany Johnson, whose technically precise drawings of multilayered imagery were on view a couple months ago in her Justin Lane studio during the West Austin Studio Tour. "I finally found

an image I liked, and it was an advertisement, featuring a schematic drawing of the gears of a watch. I don't know what that says about me or what's important to me." What it says is that Johnson finds inspiration in unlikely places, devouring maps, infographics, and landscape photography. At first, her diminutive drawings elicit a "gee whiz!" as they appear computergenerated but are actually hand-drawn.

Her drawings are more than just technical feats; they index our relationships to the natural world, collapsing the outlines of lakes, pictures of landscapes, and other natural phenomena. Johnson makes the familiar unfamiliar. Born and raised in Wisconsin, Johnson moved to Austin for graduate school after a stint working on a dairy farm.

Bethany Johnson: I have two spaces. I have a light table in this room - I also have a web design business, that's why it's relatively ordered in here.

Austin Chronicle: I was going to say, what a clean space this is!

BJ: Yeah, [laughs] the mess is next door! Sonya Berg, who is also an artist, and her husband own this place, so I rent from them, and I'm their groundskeeper.

AC: Are you really a groundskeeper?!

BJ: I am, actually! I water all the plants. I've always fantasized about having a clean room and a messy room. My

drawings have to stay clean and pristine, and in the other room I can do charcoal drawings, build and sand frames, you know, messy.

**AC:** Do you use the light table as your primary drawing surface? BJ: It depends. When I create layered drawings, I might use the light table to make the first image and for the second image I won't.

AC: Does that mean you're engaged in a process of abstraction? The first image being an analogous tracing of a source image and the second is freehand, and more responsive to the first?

BJ: I feel these drawings are more about translation of content. The first drawing is a kind of literal copying, but the result becomes abstract because it's filtered through a binary system: Is this part of the source image dark enough to make a line?

AC: Your colors seem very intentional. How did you arrive at the colors you use in these drawings?

BJ: Well, I hate to burst your bubble, but it's a mundane reason. The technical pens I use only come in select colors. You can mix the inks of the cartridges somewhat, but any other ink will clog up these tiny pens.

AC: How do you know that you're done with a series or a body of work?

BJ: I feel I haven't had a long enough career to see a pattern. After graduate school, I started making this work, and I found I had gotten into my first rut - I had never been in a

**AC:** What was your experience of being "in a rut"?

BJ: It's probably similar to writing. If you discover something that works, there's a pressure to keep making the same kind of thing. Starting a new body of work means you're going to struggle and hate it. It's hard, people won't get it, you haven't yet made the right choices with scale, technique, content. It can be really scary.

AC: Speaking of scary, I'm getting vertigo from your carpet. It looks like an aerial view of suburban streets. It perfectly fits with your aesthetic!

BJ: Yeah, I got that from the ReStore [laughs]. I had to fight a woman for it.

# **Andy Kindler**

#### THE 'COMEDIAN'S COMEDIAN' RETURNS TO EXPLAIN JUST WHY YOU DIDN'T LAUGH AT HIS LAST JOKE

Andy Kindler will tell you flat out that he's a troublemaker. "I can open up any can of worms and get people upset," the comedian says by phone as we discuss his upcoming return to Austin. If it weren't enough that his "Hack's Handbook: A Starter Kit," written for National Lampoon in 1991, called out his fellow comics on every lazy gag and tired premise they lean on, his "State of the Industry" speech, delivered annually at the Just for Laughs Festival in Montreal, savages the most popular and successful of his peers. That said, Kindler's grasp of what's truly funny - and ability to dissect it, even as he's performing his own act - has also earned him the title of "comedian's comedian." If you missed either of his visits for the Moontower Comedy & Oddity Festival (where he spent much of his act at Stateside hilariously kvetching about the crowd lined up next door to see Aziz Ansari), you owe it to yourself to catch him during his four-night stand at Cap City Comedy Club. Here are some snippets of our wide-ranging conversation, which covered his love of Austin, Texas politics, and, naturally, comedy. - Robert Faires

#### On SXSW:

"I don't see a lot of difference between something like South by Southwest and Comicon now. They've both been taken over by the movie studios, and everything somehow gets connected to superhero movies. So it's just good to be a festival where no one is dressed up as Iron Man 7 or Wonder Woman 2."

#### **On San Antonio:**

"I was in San Antonio, playing a club there, and I tweeted something like 'All 18 Obama supporters will be at the club tonight,' and someone got [upset] - people love to go after me on Twitter - and they're like, 'We're a very progressive city. We have a mayor who's ... progressive, so.' I have never been accused of being that informed. What, are you gonna hold me to facts now? I can't do a 'Texas is rednecky' joke?"



#### On the "State of the Industry":

"This year, what I think I'm gonna do in the speech is a 'Farewell to Leno,' 'cause I think he might be retiring for real. My favorite current Leno joke, which will be in the speech, is: 'I'd like to do my impression of Jay Leno, if he was a comedian. Jay Leno ... if he ... was a comedian.' And then I tell the audience. 'The joke is now over. I know many of you did not realize it's over. The joke is finished. We are in the afterglow of the joke.' I started doing the speech in 1995, which is unbelievable. After a couple of years, the head of the festival said, 'Maybe, uhhhhhh, maybe cut back on the Leno, on the anti-Leno,' and I never have."

#### On his own career:

"As I get older and have more experience in life, the type of things that you dream about - we'd all like to be wealthy beyond our wildest dreams on some level. We know all the stories of how people got all this money and success, and it did not make them happy, so we know it doesn't make you happy. But letting go of the results of what you're doing is so important. Like this happens in supermarkets all the time: People are like, 'Whatever happened to you?' I'm still doing what I've always wanted to do, and how big it gets or how much money I make for it or how popular I am in the public's eye is really not that important, even though it's hard to let that go. I just feel like, if I can keep doing what I'm doing and also have a legacy that's why I'm making a CD this summer. I just want there to be more of a record of what I've done. I'm not dying, in case you're worried. I'm fine."

# **Cloudy With a Chance of Winik**

#### Marion Winik navigates the single life in 'Highs in the Low Fifties'

To many Austinites, "the joys of single living" is a complete oxymoron and "highs in the low 50s" sounds like an absolutely miserable day. But to Marion Winik, it's life, and life is good.

Winik's name may be familiar to longtime Chronicle readers; she began her career writing personal essays in these pages back in the late Eighties. Since then, she's contributed to NPR's All Things Considered, received a fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts, and published half a dozen books of poetry and prose: First Comes Love is about her first husband and his battle with AIDS; The Lunch-Box Chronicles: Notes From the Parenting Underground includes stories from life as a single mom; Rules for the Unruly: Living an Unconventional Life is a book of advice; and Above Us Only Sky collects short remembrances dedicated to those who touched her life. She continues this deeply personal trend with her latest release, Highs in the Low Fifties: How I Stumbled Through the Joys of Single Living (Globe Pequot, 224 pp., \$21.95).

The book, which hit shelves Tuesday, comprises 16 essays cataloging Winik's adventures in dating following the end of her second marriage. From online dating profiles to therapy sessions and stereotypically disastrous dates, the subjects are funny, albeit lamentably identifiable across several generations. Though she now lives in Maryland (see her essay "Love in the Time of Baltimore"), Winik returns to Austin next month to read at BookPeople, but she offers us this forecast, an abbreviated version of the opening essay. - Monica Riese

"No, silly, of course not."


"Then why are you always talking about him?" she said.

Afterwards, we sat on my front porch and had as serious a conversation as we could manage. I tried to say that the inequality of our situations made it difficult for us to understand each other. I knew he hadn't meant to hurt me, but he had, and I didn't have three thousand dollars to spare anyway. Finally, I told him, you should never ask a woman for money in her bedroom. It just isn't done.

I gave him two twenties toward the cause and took him home. Then I ruefully closed Google Translate and signed up for Match. com, where I might not find love but I would at least find people in my age group who spoke English.

#### Shipwrecked!

Round Rock Amphitheater, 301 W. Bagdad, Round Rock, 512/850-4849 www.penfoldtheatre.org Through June 30 Running time: 1 hr., 40 min.

For its annual summer outdoor production at the Round Rock Amphitheater, Penfold Theatre Company is presenting Donald Margulies' Shipwrecked! An entertainment: the amazing adventures of Louis de Rougemont (as told by himself) - a play with a very long title and a very good cast, under the direction of Penfold Artistic Director Ryan Crowder.

Louis de Rougemont (Robert L. Berry), the character mentioned in the title, leaves home as a young man to see the world of the 1800s. During a journey by sea on a pearling vessel, he finds himself shipwrecked, meets the native population, and has several grand adventures with curious wildlife. After 30 years, he returns to London to tell his story, and things become more complicated for him. Questions are raised about the value of believing in the fantastical and what happens when we allow ourselves a few flights of fancy.

The production is tight. Crowder's direction is quick and inventive, finding ways to use a simple set (designed by Gary Varner) and only three actors to show everything from sailors at sea to an army of attacking tribesmen. The show's greatest strength is its actors. All three are versatile and creative performers; Julie Linnard and Nathan Jerkins make up the ensemble of many smaller characters, and their timing is excellent. Also, Jerkins does such a great job playing a dog that at one performance, an actual dog in the audience became visibly pleased when Jerkins appeared as the character. Dude: You got buy-in from an actual dog. That is so cool.

Penfold's choice of play makes sense on many levels. It's family-friendly, and the story is broad enough to withstand the distractions of an outdoor space with the occasional freight train running nearby. It is fun and imaginative, and allows for broad strokes. The trouble is that the first two-thirds of the play contains almost no conflict. Sure, it's interesting to watch de Rougemont embark on his adventures and discover new people and places, but without any stakes or suspense, it lacks a reason for the audience to invest themselves in de Rougemont and what may happen to him next. Yet it's necessary to show this journey; otherwise, the questions that arise later in the story have no impact. So what's left is a structural flaw: We need to believe in and engage with de Rougemont on his maritime adventures in order to care about what happens later, but his adventures are so uncomplicated that they fail to really pull us in.

What Penfold does with the script is great, however. The company has again shown its talent for casting great actors in a show that seeks to engage its audiences in a fun evening of theatre. - Elizabeth Cobbe

#### Gold Show/Rose Show The Off Center, 2211-A Hidalgo June 14

It's widely known that participating in physical activity and creative endeavors are a way to clear one's head. But Gold Show/Rose Show, a joint concert by dancer-choreographers Heloise Gold and Julie Nathanielsz, were reminders of the power of empathy: In witnessing the films and dances, we audience members were invigorated, too.

First, Gold's "Quiet Movie," a slideshow of textured materials and natural objects, lulled us into a gentle pace and an observational state, the perfect condition in which to enjoy "Dream Birds," a new version of a 1982 work, in which Gold and Leigh Gaymon-Jones performed absurd avian sounds, movements, and rituals. In "Resonance," Gold allowed her body to

Last on Gold's half of the program was "Noisy Movie," in which footage of Gold prancing atop what looked like a dented, upturned, circular feed trough, amid a desolate landscape, was juxtaposed with shots of Beverly Bajema (a collaborator of both choreographers) turning the handle of a large compost bin. Often, but especially in "Noisy Movie," Gold's explorations were reminiscent of child's play, and, as with children, play can be serious work. Bajema turned her compost, and Gold, her slight figure contrasting with the loud crashes made by her landings on the metal object, leapt from one side of the trough to the other, obsessed with the search for what might be found there.

Where Gold's observations were outward, Nathanielsz, with sensation-based movement, explored and observed inward. In "Yo, Genesis," a solo lit in rose (lighting by Stephen Pruitt), she was feminine, yet a

> being of anomalous nature: a creature without creature comforts. She danced mostly in silence, and, when a song did play, it was as if the music was a second dancer onstage. In Nathanielsz' work, gestures are removed from emotional attachment but retain intensity. The body is "available" to move from any starting point, in any direction, so

there are physical non sequiturs and tests of momentum. Though the black-box setting was less ideal than the in-the-round seating at previous performances of "What Is Common." Nathanielsz' trio for herself. Gold. and Elaine Dove, the diversity in the dancers' sizes and appearances capitalized on our newly heightened powers of observation and kinetic awareness. - Jonelle Seitz



tremble and languish in consort with the sound waves produced by percussionist Nick Hennies' mallets against a vibraphone. Though the sounds were at times piercing, the clarity of sound-made-visible was invigorating: During the piece, I realized, a corner of my mind tidily framed a problem that had been sitting there, muddily, for weeks.



#### 'Constructed Landscapes' AMOA-Arthouse at the Jones Center, 700 Congress, 512/453-5312 www.amoa-arthouse.org **Through June 30**

Seher Shah's exhibition "Constructed Landscapes" is full of esoteric ideas about the divergence of art and architecture through the convergence of interior and exterior space. The work is a reaction to modernist structures, vis-à-vis Le Corbusier and Louis Kahn, and a continuation of the theoretical work of Daniel Libeskind and Bernard Tschumi. In other

words, the collection is art about art. It assumes viewers enter the Jones Center with some understanding of its provenance. an assumption that AMOA-Arthouse attempts to steward with lengthy written explanations, an essay by University of Texas School of Architecture assistant professor Igor Siddiqui and an artist interview performed by Associate Curator Rachel Adams.

The descriptions do provide some entrance into the work, but the pamphlet containing the essay and the interview is

more alienating than the exhibition left to its own devices. It's full of difficult-to-parse artspeak, until we come to similar conclusions on our own.

Approached blankly, Object Relic (Unité d'Habitation) reveals the space contained within a structure by reducing it to a footprint and beams (no walls), with banner flags flow-

ing freely throughout, releasing the space from the form. And yet, the graphite and gouache piece reminds us of the imposition of the building on the space it occupies with a solid monolithic sheet, working against the three-dimensional elements of the drawing. It also reminds us that architecture begins on paper, with ideas. Shah - who was born in Pakistan but lives in Brooklyn – repeats this motif in Mammoth: Aerial Landscape Proposals, a collection of archival digital prints also on display.

With Object Repetition (Line to Distance), an installation piece in the lobby, she goes further, using sculpture to explore the idea of repetition, which is appealing on paper but in reality feels autocratic. It calls to mind photos of Chinese government housing, seen from the air. The only pieces that suggest a human presence (other than the viewer's) are Geometric Landscapes and the Spectacle of Force and The Mirror Spectacle, which do so by interpreting the coronation  $\dot{\rm c}$  ceremony at the durbar in Delhi, India, from a ground level.

Returning to Object Relic, the structure itself has been removed, so that we can see, again, its volume and, therefore, its influence on the landscape. The piece, we learn by reading the description, is specifically defamiliarizing Le Corbusier's housing concept *Unité d'Habitation*, famously applied to low-income housing in Marseilles. We might, then, read Object Relic as Shah's commentary on Le Corbusier's commentary on low-income housing (cheap, cold, utilitarian).

As the exhibition literature attempts to show, Shah reveals architecture as a practice by which ideas become reality, and in the most imposing way: by affecting the space we inhabit. And yet, art, which serves no practical function, gives us a venue to explore the effect on our lives. - Matthew Irwin





# Zhi on Ice

#### ZHI TEA ROLLS OUT SIGNATURE ICED TEA **BLENDS FOR SUMMER**

When Jeffrey Lorien launched Zhi Tea six years ago, he expected sales to naturally decline over the summer months, believing most people consider tea a cold-weather beverage. So he was initially surprised when sales remained steady throughout the summer, and even increased. Lorien realized he had underestimated the Texan love affair with iced tea. No more! Lorien estimates that iced tea accounts for at least half of his tea summer sales. This vear. Zhi manager Jessica Evans has developed four new teas blended specifically for drinking iced, one for each of the hottest months.

May's tea was Tropical Green, a green tea with notes of pineapple, papaya, and citrus. Blended specifically for "sun tea" and cold brewing, Tropical Green comes in tins of four 1-ounce tea bags, each one designed to make a whole pitcher of iced tea. "Each tin sells for \$8, so it comes out to \$2 a pitcher, or about 25¢ a glass," says Evans. June's tea is Violet Femme, a vanilla- and lavenderinfused Earl Grey. "The flavors of vanilla and lavender soften the bergamot, creating a more complex profile," Evans explains. "Iced, it is irresistible!" Violet Femme is sold loose. in Zhi's regular 4-ounce tins (\$18.95).

July's tea will be Summer Strawberry, a caffeine-free, green rooibos blend, with tart strawberry and healthful organic bilberry. August will unveil Pink Lemonade Tea, another caffeine-free blend, featuring organic lemon myrtle, rose hips, and hibiscus. "It needs no sweetener," says Lorien. "It is naturally sweet, tart, and refreshing, like a perfect lemonade." Although Summer Strawberry and Pink Lemonade won't be available until July and August, respectively, both can be sampled at the Zhi retail store and cafe in East Austin. (Zhi Tea is also



available for purchase online and at many Austin coffee shops and restaurants.)

"We have had a lot of requests for a bilberry tea," says Lorien. "Bilberry has notable amounts of antioxidants, as well as antibacterial and antifungal properties. For the entire summer series of teas, we wanted to 'marry' what people think of as healthful and what they think of as indulgent." - Kate Thornberry food-o-file

Check their website (www.saltand time.com) for pie selection, prices, ordering, and pick-up information... Manor Road's Restaurant Row will be expanding later this year. Look for Olivia O'Neal to open the second outlet of her Cupcake Wars-winning **Sugar Mama's Bakeshop** (1905 S. First) in a space she's just leased at 2406 Manor Rd. O'Neal hopes to be open by Thanksgiving. We're also hearing that a larger space in the same building will become a restaurant to be designed by A Parallel Architecture, but no word yet on a name... And speaking of holiday pies, Bud the Pieman is at it again. This time, the owner of Royers Round Top Cafe will deliver 500 holiday pies and \$25 Walmart gift cards to the victims of the devastating tornado in Moore, Okla., for the Fourth of July. Another generous cafe patron is underwriting the cost of the pies and their delivery trip, so Royers is asking their customers and pie fans to chip in for the gift cards before their departure deadline of June 30: donate to the Eat Mo'ore Pie Project at store.royersroundtopcafe.com... Kudos to chef Paul Oui on his wins at last week's 2013 S. Pellegrino Cooking Cup regatta in Venice. Qui garnered both the Young Chef of the Year Award and the Inside the Cooking Award, impressing the international panel of judges with variations on his signature dashi broth and steamed egg custard. After hosting a book signing for his pal chef Edward Lee and the whirlwind trip to Italy, Qui is back in Austin for the grand opening of his eponymous Qui restaurant (1600 E. Sixth) on June 20. He will also host a \$150-a-plate luncheon at the restaurant to benefit Urban Roots on Saturday, June 22. Tickets to that can be purchased at www.urbanrootsatx.org/events. Just reading Qui's schedule makes me dizzy... I attended last week's Town Hall meeting on the urban farm code update and came away concerned that some of the one-size-fits-all regulations being proposed could stifle the diversity and originality of our urban farms, not to mention their community outreach and profitability. The best suggestion posed during the meeting was to extend an invitation to all members of the City Council and the Planning Commission to visit all of the existing urban farms before any more regulations are adopted. I mentioned the potential visits to Council Aide Andrew Moore and Councilman Chris Riley at the W Hotel's Bee Party and got a positive response. Kristi Willis (@kristifarm2tbl) is working to make the visits happen.

#### Amici Cellars www.amicicellars.com

John Harris grew up in Houston and went to college at the University of Texas in the Seventies. During his career in tech, he helped create a clever website (eFax) that allowed all of us to tank our fax machines. Hallelujah. Harris started Amici Cellars along with a few friends 20 years ago. They decided to keep the winery small and make the best wines they could, focusing on red wines in the \$30-\$50 range. My favorite was, and still is, their perfectly balanced Monterey Pinot Noir (\$30). In 2009, they had the chance to bring

on a new partner, one of California's most famous winemakers, Joel Aiken. Aiken

had spent the prior 27 years sourcing grapes and making wines for Beaulieu Vineyard, including their ultra-famous Georges de Latour. Of course, having a new winemaker who had dealt with the wide-ranging Beaulieu's catalog was a boon. But even more important was Aiken's encyclopedic knowledge of where the best

little off-the-map vineyards were and how to find the often reclusive farmers who owned them. Suddenly, opportunities opened on both ends of the financial scale. Aiken found two spectacular Cabernet vineyards which have yielded wines going for as much as \$125 a bottle, but he also knew where the best underpriced gems were hidden.

So now we have wines made by the talented team for less than \$20. The team aims for purity and avoids oakiness or big buttery flavors. Their No Curfew red wine (\$17) is a blend of Zinfandel. Syrah, and Petite Sirah. As you might guess, it is a dark wine with sufficient tannic grip, but it is also soft enough to be a pleasant quaffing wine for a night on the patio. Serve it with grilled meat, especially a burger or a steak. Their other wine under \$20 that I recommend is Olema Chardonnay (\$15), which tastes like Chablis made in California - namely, just the pure lovely tastes and aromas of Chardonnay. This wine is impeccable with raw oysters. Olema Chardonnay is available at the King Liquor on Southwest Parkway and at several restaurants. 

# THERE'S ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT AT FREEDMEN'S

When I lived in West Campus in the early Nineties, I would often walk past an old building at the corner of San Gabriel and 24th and think how cool the historic landmark would be as a restaurant. When I heard the news that a group of service industry veterans were taking it over, I was overjoyed. After the usual permit delays and construction woes, Freedmen's opened its doors on New Year's Eve 2012. We have visited a few times and, while the experiences have mostly been positive, there are still plenty of kinks both in the front and back of the house that need ironing out.

Joel Mozersky did a bang-up job of restoring the interior to its 1869 aesthetic, honoring its many occupants over the years and creating an atmosphere of home. I love the historic feel and intimacy of the cozy quarters indoors and am enchanted by the dog-friendly patio, especially at night when low lighting casts a nostalgic glow.

The bar specializes in classic cocktails and special craft creations. Smoke permeates every aspect of Freedmen's, and the bar is not an exception. The Smokin' Cactus (\$8), made with mescal, grapefruit, lime, jalapeño-infused agave syrup, and smoked sea salt, and the Three Day Weekend, made with gin, basil, and fresh-squeezed, smoked lemon, are great examples, both refreshing and unique. We have also enjoyed a very respectable Sazerac; Freedmen's barmen take great pride in their Whiskey Wall, with extensive offerings from around the world and a special whiskey of the month. The wine selection is limited, but features better than garden-variety offerings.

However, one problem that seems to plague Freedmen's is their inconsistency in keeping items in stock. On our first visit a few months ago, we ordered the **Holy Trinity Plate** (\$17), consisting of brisket, pork rib, and sausage, but they had run out of

ribs. It was late on a Friday night, so it was understandable, and the kitchen let us substitute chicken for the missing ribs. We were pleased with the moist, succulent brisket and homemade sausage, but the chicken was tough and underdone. Politely, the manager came to tell us she would take the chicken off the bill, but assured us that it wasn't underdone: "This is the way it is with smoked meats, they stay pink on the inside," she explained. Pink, yes; tough and bloody, no. Nevertheless, we enjoyed ourselves, service was very friendly, and we were espe-

cially impressed with the **smoked beets** (\$8) served with a dollop of creamy goat cheese.

My husband and I returned for dinner on a recent Monday night. We started with a couple of excellent cocktails while

we perused the menu. We began the meal with a **bone marrow appetizer** (\$8), which came in its own cute, cast-iron skillet with soft, warm French bread and a side of orange marmalade that was tasty on its own, but the unctuous wonder of the marrow is best enjoyed all by itself. We were enticed by the **Pit Chili** (\$6), served over Fritos with shredded smoked cheddar and chopped onions, but the chunks of nicely spiced brisket were too large and a tad greasy, which made the chips soggy quickly; I prefer my Fritos chili pie with finely chopped meat and crisp chips.

At this point, problems began piling up. I ordered a bottle of sparkling wine, but the barman said they were out of all sparkling wine. I assumed they must have done crazy mimosa business during the Sunday brunch, but he went on to say they were out of most of their wines. We settled on a Sauvignon Blanc that was not our first choice, but had enough acidity to cut the fat and smoke. The next item they were out of was the beef short ribs, so we ordered the **pork spare ribs** (\$11), which came with more of that awesome bread, a sweetish

sauce not to my liking, and homemade assorted pickles. We found the ribs a tad too peppery, but they were tender and nicely smoked. I pictured the **Smoke Stack** (\$9) – advertised as pork belly and brisket served with house sauce and pickled jalapeños – as a combo plate, and thought it would be great to try two meats instead of just one. Out came a chopped brisket sandwich, pork belly undetectable, barely tossed with sauce, and no jalapeños anywhere. "We are out," said the barman in a now-familiar refrain. Out of pickled jalape-

nos on a Monday night? I pointed out that based on the menu description, we hadn't expected a sandwich. He read the menu and agreed, but didn't think to offer to send us anything else. Had I known what the dish real-

ly was, I would have ordered something other than a nine-dollar, so-so brisket sandwich. Thankfully, the sides were good. We chose the **German potatoes** (\$5), hot and bacon-y, with a nice tang and lots of caramelized onions, cleverly served in a canning jar. We also enjoyed the arugula salad, a refreshing contrast to all the heavy meats and starch, with grapefruit sections, crunchy cucumber slices, and a light balsamic vinaigrette. Minor quibble: We had to serve the wine ourselves since our friendly barman was always off doing something else.

After finding out they were also out of the special dessert, we opted for the **Salted & Smoked Chocolate Mousse** (\$5), which I gladly polished off while my husband discussed and sampled the Whiskey Wall with the barman. I wanted to like Freedmen's for so many reasons, but they simply must correct their inconsistencies and pay a bit more attention to detail where par levels are concerned. Right now, I'd describe it as a very nice bar with above average food, rather than a contender as a serious restaurant.

## What the Hell Happened at Austinist?

LOCAL SITE DRAMATICALLY CHANGES DIRECTION AFTER NYC OVERHAUL

It'd be a misnomer to call anything that started in 2005 an "institution," but Austinist - the scrappy group blog started that year by Ben Brown as part of Jake Dobkin and Jen Chung's NYC-based Gothamist network of culture websites - has certainly established itself as an important player in the Austin media landscape since then. And while the site's URL is still active (indeed, more active than ever), much of what was true of Austinist in its eight previous years of documenting local arts, culture, news, and politics has changed over the past few weeks. Out is the allvolunteer format, many of the long-form (and sometimes meandering) posts, the hands-off approach from the site's out-of-town owners, and virtually all of the staff. In is a new agenda from Dobkin and Chung - with a focus, at least for the time being, on short, link-based posts - and a dramatically-reduced staff led by a new editor-inchief, Aleksander Chan.

So what happened at Austinist? According to former Editor Barbara Strickland, who was fired by Dobkin and Chung on May 31, the changes started during South by Southwest. "A day after Interactive started, Adam [Schragin, the site's then editor-in-chief] got an email chock-full of bright ideas about how to cover SXSW," Strickland says. "The SXSW intervention left us flummoxed both because of the timing and because of how heavy-handed it was." Strickland says that, before that point, the site's relationship with the New York owners had been "hands-off almost to the point of neglect," and she characterized the ideas from New York as "a push for more buzz and less substance."

At the end of the Festival, Schragin, who had contributed to the site since 2007, resigned from his unpaid role. Within the week, Gothamist posted a listing for a salaried editor. Chan, a 2012 University of Texas grad whose résumé in Austin includes a stint as the managing editor of *The Daily Texan* and time at the local blog CultureMap, as well as freelancing with the *Chronicle*, landed the gig.

Dobkin, who describes the changes to the site as "a little shakeup," explained that the decision to fire Strickland was a matter of focus. "We tried having her work with Aleks," he explained via email, "but it was too many cooks in the kitchen, and ultimately we wanted to take things in a different direction." Upon Strickland's firing, much of the volunteer staff resigned, including many of the section editors.

Strickland, for her part, doesn't bear Chan any ill will. "He was in what would be an awkward position for anyone," she says. But there are questions about what will become of a site that was built around a multitude of voices covering Austin culture from a variety of angles now that it's in the hands of far fewer voices. (As of this writing, the front page of Austinist featured nine stories, seven of which were written by Chan.)

"To readers, Austinist offered a voice about local news, politics, and arts that was knowledgeable without being dismissive or, on the other hand, pandering," Schragin says of his vision for the site during his tenure. "I felt like it was a comfortable place for visitors who wanted a dose of what was going on that didn't insult their intelligence, treat them like a



statistic on Google Analytics, or, alternately, get stuck in the cynicism and arrogance that sometimes infects writing about Austin. It was a curious, multifaceted place. 'Monochrome' and 'singular' are two words I'd use to describe it now, which seems bizarre considering we once had as many as 80 voices writing under that royal 'we.'"

The site's content now is substantially shorter than it was under Schragin and Strickland, a change that Dobkin describes as a shift away from "part-time/organic/old-school-style blogging" – the 1,500-word, first-person essays on gentrification are gone – and toward

"2013-style, full-time blogging." What that looks like at the moment is a focus on quick, clickworthy posts that mostly respond to stories broken by other outlets or draw heavily on press releases. (Though Dobkin disagrees with the characterization, all nine of the posts on the main page at press time seem to fit that description.) According to Dobkin, though, the future of the site is a bit more diverse. "The best model for what I'd like to see in the future is Gothamist, which has a mix of short and long content, original content, and aggregated content," he says. "The past [few] weeks have been a transitional period, and, as things settle down, you'll see more consistency and originality."

In the meantime, Dobkin seems pleased with the direction the site is moving in. "We're looking forward to bringing [to Austinist] the same verve and energy that our other sites have," he says, adding that the early signs have been positive. "The site hit its best traffic ever last month."

## LOCAL MEETUP PUTS FACES TO CROWDFUNDING CAMPAIGNS


The honeymoon with crowdfunding is over. Gone are the days when even half-baked ideas garnered enough money to meet company or individual goals with ease. Today, Kickstarter and Indiegogo runneth over with campaigns, making it difficult to ferret out worthy endeavors. Prospective backers also now realize they can't put their wallets behind every film, game, art project, article of clothing, piece of novelty furniture, etc. their mouse happens upon. So, how do you find something decent, vetted, and local? You get crowdsourcing initiatives to showcase projects in front of a live audience; that's how. And that's exactly what Austin's own Highlighter intends to do at its free bimonthly meetup.

Spearheaded by Shelley Smith of local independent game studio Minicore, the Highlighter was originally the idea of Jen Bullard, who chairs the local chapter of the International Game Developers Association. But it was Smith who successfully summoned the combined powers of the IGDA and the newly founded Texas Creative Incubator, which strives to ensure a healthy business and creative ecosystem to keep digital media start-ups thriving.

Three projects have already been chosen to pitch their products or tell tales of the troubled but often blessed waters of crowdsourcing. This month's Highlighter has a gaming bent with David Tian of Syraca Studios, who talks up his team's shoot-'em-up game *Phoenix Revival*. Smith's Minicore compatriot John Warren showcases another video game, *Laika Believes*. While not hocking anything right now, Sam Killermann has had success in the past with raising funds for his nonprofit, Gamers Against Bigotry, and shares his expertise.

When asked why an event like this is necessary in an increasingly digital landscape, Smith said, "We like knowing what is going on in Austin. We like seeing cool things come out of Austin. And I definitely think we are willing and eager to help someone local succeed." Not to mention that getting in on the bottom floor of a local endeavor is always good for bragging rights in this town.

## Reading the next chapter of the AFS playbook by RICHARD WHITTAKER

though he'd probably blush at the title, when Lars Nilsen announced earlier this year that he was joining the staff of the Austin Film Society, that was headline news for film aficionados. Synonymous with cult cinema as part of the Alamo Drafthouse booking team, Nilsen sees his new gig as a kind of homecoming. He said, "I always felt like I was in debt to AFS for everything they had done for me."

When he moved to Austin in 1994, AFS' free screenings were his film school. "I was a snot-nosed kid going and watching free movies," he said. "By doing that I was seeing Godard and Fassbender and Carl Theodor Dreyer and John Woo and all these movies that I would probably have never sought out by myself." Now he is returning the favor by planning its latest programming strand: AFS at the Marchesa. The society isn't taking over the Marchesa Hall & Theatre, but it is becoming its biggest regular tenant, with a plan for 16 screenings a month. It helps that the North Austin venue is run by veteran punk promoter Deborah Gill (see "Parlor Game," Music, Feb. 27, 2009), a kindred soul to the society's grit-and-determination approach. As Nilsen put it, "Punk rock is the guiding and abiding model by which the people get things done.'

Many cities have film societies, and often they are the only choice for audiences seeking an alternative to that weekend's newest releases. Yet in their quest to educate and entertain, sometimes they suffer from what Nilsen dubbed Vertigo syndrome: "You see the same classic films over and over again." That's less of an issue in Austin, where audience options swerve from the sacred to the profane, from the Old World grandeur of the Paramount's summer season to the experimentalism of Cinema East. Nilsen compares Austin's diverse cineastes to punk scenesters: "You've got the kids that are soaking up the scene and get all the benefits. Then as those kids get older, maybe they fall away from the scene. But if they stay committed and their heart's still in it, then they become the big kids, and they're the ones who go, 'OK, we're going to do this punk show, we gotta go find a storage space, we've gotta find a

There aren't many superstar film programmers. So even hangar, we've gotta go steal some beer." That cinematic cornucopia doesn't remove the need for a good, active film society. Nilsen said, "When you look at what's needed from AFS, you look at the whole city and at what people have available, and then you say, 'What is the other excellent programming that they're not going to get in this setting?"

AFS Executive Director Rebecca Campbell agreed. "It's kind of a miracle that the film society and other places in Austin offer so much alternative fare," she said. So as the shape of Austin audiences changes, so does the role of the society. She's overseeing one of the biggest periods of change in its history: New staff, new programming series, and the

growth of Austin Studios mean a reinvigorated society, and having Nilsen on board is one surprising bonus. She said, "Lars approached Holly [Herrick, associate artistic director] and said he was thinking about making a change."

It's not a complete parting of the ways with the Alamo - Nilsen still hosts Weird Wednesday, his weekly celebration of cinema's sleazy underbelly, at the Alamo Ritz. Think of it more as musical differences. Over the past five years, the Drafthouse has undergone a massive expansion, adding extra sites

not just around Austin but across the U.S. They were becoming the Green Day of alternative cinema, while Nilsen wanted to be in Black Flag. He said, "When I looked in the mirror, I really had to admit that I didn't have that much interest programming for New York or Los Angeles or suburbs."

His decision to join AFS is a major moment for both. It's not just that he is a walking IMDb; he also knows how to navigate the increasingly complicated world of hunting down archival prints. A frighteningly large number of classic films have never been digitized, and studios are increasingly coy about leasing out their archival 35mm prints, but Nilsen and his fellow programmers know how to seduce them into handing over their treasures. It's a skill that he's happy to deploy for AFS. Nilsen said, "If I wasn't programming movies for Austinites, I may as well go back and drive a cab again."

His first big project is bringing his encyclopedic knowledge to the Marchesa. Campbell describes the space and the programming opportunities it brings "as a great move to this long-held dream of having our own theatre." For years, the society rented spaces around town like the Paramount and the Alamo Drafthouse, and it has a small screening room at Austin Studios, but no permanent home. Four years ago, the society started thinking about becoming less nomadic ("Nonprofits in general like the idea of having a storefront," Campbell said). The first thought was to build their own theatre, but that would take time and money, so they settled on a "hybrid between what we're doing and a brick-and-mortar future."

Staff had looked at several sites, including the old Dobie Theater, before they came across the old Lincoln Village theatre. The space has been through a lot of changes since the lights went out in 1999. Two of the three screens were torn out and turned into exhibition space, first as the Monarch Events Center and now as the Marchesa. It's served as a concert venue and conference space, but through it all, one 278-seat screen has remained in place. Yet it still needs some renovations, and the society is trying to raise \$120,000 by July 3 to undertake massive technical upgrades. First is a 35mm changeover system - essential for archival prints and a digital projector and DCP system, so they can screen new films and digital restorations. That will also mean a new Dolby 5.1 surround system and rehabbing the projection booth. "The possibilities just come wafting out of there," said Nilsen. "You see the ghosts dancing across the screen of all the movies that have played there and are going to play there, and it's just this magic Cinema Paradiso feeling."

Ultimately, the society is still thinking about having its own permanent location, and now that it has absorbed the old National Guard Armory into Austin Studios (see "The Changing Shape of Austin Studios," May 10), there is early talk about building a bigger screening room or theatre there. With that in mind, Campbell said, "The bulk of the money that we're raising and spending is for equipment that is conveyable." For now, it's essential to turn the Marchesa into what they hope will be the "best little art house in Texas." Campbell said, "It might be an interim solution, but it's one that could last a good, long time."

Part of the money will go into renovating the lobby, creating another space for Austin audiences to mix and mingle with Austin directors. After all, this isn't just growing as a film-appreciation city; there's also been an explosion in film production. Since 1996, the AFS Grant program (formerly

known as the Texas Filmmakers' Production Fund) has provided development, production, and finishing cash for a who's who of local rising talent. Recent recipients, such as Kat Candler ("Black Metal"), the Zellner Bros. (Kid-Thing), and Andrew Bujalski (Computer Chess), are already winning awards for their work. But Campbell would ultimately like the society to provide more production support. She said: "We work like hell to raise money for filmmaker grants. Wouldn't it be great if we could get more

For Nilsen, the fans and the filmmakers are all part of the same film-appreciating crowd, and a key role of AFS is to bring them closer together. He said: "We're in a real renaissance of filmmaking, with incredible filmmakers. Somebody's got to serve that, and other entities are going to serve that to a certain extent, but we're the one that's going to work at it full time, every day." The Marchesa will play a key role in that task, bringing local audiences and local directors together. "I go to these screenings, and I see the Zellners, and I see Kat Candler, and they're sitting there and enjoying these movies," Nilsen said. "We're putting together this giant cerebral cortex."



## In a New York State of Mind

When you're local indie-pop orchestra **Mother Falcon**, and your band's the size of a soccer team, everything becomes more complicated: ordering food, dividing up the drink tickets, assembling band members for a photo, and, more than anything else, touring.

Riding the momentum of their May sophomore release, *You Knew*, which introduced the young, black-clad anti-band-geeks as Austin's newest **NPR** darlings, Mother Falcon embarked on a cleverly booked tour allowing them to play 15 East Coast shows in one month without spending all their time and money on gas, road munchies, and low-budget hotels. The band also subleased an apartment in New York City: a two-story brownstone in the working-class neighborhood of Ridgewood, Queens.

"Some of our neighbors are probably wondering who we are," violinist **Maurice Chammah** admitted while in line at Brooklyn's **Di Fara Pizza.** "Especially when we all leave [the apartment] wearing black, like some kind of gang."

The 17-person travel team has spent the past few weeks alternating between two Gotham residencies and hopping in the band vans to play nearby cities like Boston, Philadelphia, and Washington, D.C.

"We're minimizing the number of times we have to line our schedules up and [we're making] everything we do count a lot more," explained multi-instrumentalist **Matt Puckett**. "I've heard it's the fourth time you come through a city that you start to make an impact. We can't afford to tour through here four times, so we brainstormed a way to do it all in one trip."

Bassist **Dusty Rhodes** counts Mother Falcon's onstage collaborations as the most unique part of the trip. To date, the band's traded songs with banjo master **Tony Trischka**, performed "Grace" with **Jeff Buckley**'s old guitarist **Gary Lucas**, and covered **Radiohead** tracks with Kickstarter queen **Amanda Palmer**.

Mother Falcon ditches the Big Apple on June 30, allowing them a month back home

before heading out to Los Angeles for another one of these uniquely arranged tours.

"I never thought late-night shows would be open to me," admitted Watson, now 50. "I play roots stuff, not flavor-of-the-day music."

Word has it that the invitation to play came directly from **Big Dave** himself, who heard the Lone Star stalwart on SiriusXM radio and ordered his assistant to book him for the show. The longtime host seems to have an affinity for Texas songwriters, personally requesting **Ray Wylie Hubbard** to perform earlier this year.

Watson will perform "I Lie When I Drink," a track off his recently released *El Rancho Azul*.

Afterward, Watson jets west for four dates

with **Old Crow Medicine Show**.



## Black Joe on the Green

Black Joe Lewis & the
Honeybears play their only
Austin show this summer
Wednesday evening in Zilker
Park for KGSR's Blues on the
Green. The local soul shouter
recently unleashed a screaming

new track called "Skulldiggin" that, with its unholy fuzz riffage and loud, loud lyrics, lands closer to psych-metal than the funked-out soul of his first two albums.

Asked if the single foreshadows a change in direction, Lewis offered: "The record overall is a lot harder, but it's still got some soul and blues. We have a new drummer, and I'm the only guitarist now, so it feels a little different. But I think it's our best work yet, because the vibe is so strong."

Electric Slave hits shelves August 27 on Vagrant Records, after which Lewis hauls away on a nationwide tour.

## **Who's Yer Vancouver Producer?**

Holed up in a Vancouver studio working on his band's next EP, **Not in the Face** singer **Jonathan Terrell** recalled the first time he met famed record producer **Bob Ezrin**.

"I was pretty nervous," Terrell recounted. "He kept handing me instruments to try out, and then he'd say, 'Oh yeah, that's the bass that **Roger Waters** played on *The Wall*,' or 'Cool, **Lou Reed** played

that guitar on *Berlin.*' You just kind of laugh like it's no big deal, but inside you're fuzzing out because you're casually holding rock & roll history."

In addition to Ezrin, who also holds credits with Kiss and Alice Cooper, studio protégé Garth Richardson adds time-tested credits like Rage Against the Machine's debut and the Melvin's

Houdini. The two spent most of June working with Terrell and his Not in the Face crew, which includes drummer **Wes Cargal** and guitarist **Michael Anthony Gibson**, for the band's still-unnamed EP, the hard-rocking trio's first recorded output since last year's Walk EP. Ezrin's actually overseeing the project from Nashvlle via Skype, phone, and email, but he remains integral, guiding the group through a series of grueling, 12-hour-plus workdays.

"Two of the greatest living producers are challenging the shit out of us," Terrell said. "You think these Texas boys are gonna back down? No dice. [Ezrin] and Garth are fucking geniuses. They care so much about the song. It's been an honor to watch them work with ours."

"Their interest has helped raise awareness among supporters who would have never heard about us otherwise. Also, we have received donations in their honor that we know are a direct result of their support."

In January, I rifled through 500 pages of Pete Townshend's autobiography on the Texas Riviera and, just prior to South by Southwest, swallowed whole a work of fiction by Lone Star hero Michael Nesmith. And mind you, I stopped reading books on my very last day of formal education. Yet now, after another spring in the trenches of local music festivals, a different coast beckons, and the only thing to do there, besides not work, is read. Five hundred pages of Jimmy Buffett anyone? John Lydon's autobiography slots in for trips to Montreal and New Jersey next month. Springsteen on Springsteen herein has me jacked for the Garden State! - Raoul Hernandez

Life and Music of Lightnin' Hopkins by Timothy J. O'Brien & David Ensminger University of Texas Press, 294 pp., \$29.95



Despite the plethora of interviews and material on Lightnin'


Hopkins, Texas' seminal bluesman remains alluringly elusive. Mojo Hand's greatest contribution may thus be the rigorous academic pursuit of its subject through the archives and records scattered in the wake of his resolutely fringed lifestyle. O'Brien, whose manuscript received a posthumous polish from Ensminger, meticulously traces Hopkins' life through the myths and misinformation in detailed exhumation of contracts, first person accounts, and the songs themselves, portraying the artist as stubbornly frustrating to his own success even as the industry took advantage of him. O'Brien contends from the outset that Hopkins' contradictions sprung from his early experiences in East Texas, producing a talent both humbly rural yet determinedly dapper. The guitarist's insistence on up-front payments ignored long-term royalties, which resulted in a collection being taken up before his 1978 Austin City Limits taping. Houston's vibrant Third Ward of the mid-century becomes equally honored in the text, Hopkins epitomizing both the outlandish talent and marginalized existence of the neighborhood. An invaluable work of scholarship on a still often misunderstood artist. - Doug Freeman Enjoy the Experience: Homemade Records 1958-1992 by Johan Kugelberg, Michael P. Daley, and Paul Major Sinecure Books, 512 pp., \$65

Once upon a time in a world not so far away, making your own records was a prohibitive proposition. Between the high costs of recording and manufacturing, and the impossibilities of distribution in the pre-Internet era, vanity records were the province of the bold,



the unconventional, and the highly deluded. From idiosyncratic lounge singers and pizza parlor organists to loner folkies, psychedelic gospel messengers, and uncomfortably earnest anti-pop stars, Enjoy the Experience chronicles the golden age of

private pressings with contagious aplomb. A certain degree of irreverence is to be expected when confronted by thousands of garish LP covers and an accompanying 2-CD set featuring heretofore unimaginable performers like Dennis the Fox funking it up on the singularly wrong "Piledriver," but Kugelberg and his contributors avoid familiar cool-andstrange tropes to focus on the subliminal purity of these albums. Aside from outsider standard-bearers like the Shaggs and Gary Wilson, this textbook-length ride navigates unfamiliar terrain. Kenneth Higney's acidified disco melts down into the mob-financed tambourine sweetness of Houston family band the Rhodes Kids before leaving you stuck in




#### House of Earth by Woody Guthrie Harper Collins, 288 pp., \$25.99

House of Earth will soon become a classic by association. It's the only fully realized work of fictional prose in Woody Guthrie's extended catalog, unearthed in a library stack at the University of Tulsa. Artifacts like this don't come along every day, especially from one of the most seminal figures in American music. The brief novel's inspiration comes from its author's fixation with adobe houses, the Dust Bowl Troubadour fascinated by the concept of building a habitat out of the very elements to which he's attuned. Although he never built one himself, he did compose this manuscript, a story about Tike and Ella May Hamlin, and their quest to build a literal house of earth. There's speculation the folk bard sought Hollywood interest, a big-budget adaptation to demonstrate the utility and existential rightness in going adobe. That interest never materialized,

perhaps due to the visceral and undeniably uncomfortable 30-page sex scene that colors much of the Hamlin's interaction. Juices get splayed, euphemisms get used, and, weirdly enough, pillow-talk revolves around how the two will build this new house. The scene is honest, frank, and defiantly bizarre, much like the book. With dialog exchanges in long, winding soliloquies, the plot moves in a barely-there thread to justify the continuing philosophical searching. It does, however, give us an unprecedented look into the mind of Woody Guthrie and his intense, resonant compassion for the farming class of Depression-era America. Like his music, it feels alive to this day. - Luke Winkie

Detroit Rock City: The Uncensored History of Rock & Roll in America's Loudest City



by Steve Miller Da Capo Press, 336 pp., \$16.99 (paper)

An oral history of Motor City music told through singers. scenesters, managers, producers, club owners, and others who lived to recall the Midwest's hardest rocking town, Detroit

Rock City offers insider access to over 50 years of down-and-dirty rock & roll. "How could you trust a guy who didn't get high?" wonders early MC5 Svengali John Sinclair about Ted Nugent, whose Amboy Dukes, along with the Stooges, Alice Cooper, and to a lesser extent Kiss, dominate the book's early chapters. Their exploits with drugs, guns, and shady business, commingled with cameos from the Who, Zeppelin, Bowie, and Johnny Thunders provide plenty of intrigue. Later, the insurgence of punk and hardcore bring forth grimy greats like Negative Approach and the Meatmen, before the millennial garage boom turns half the scene into potential celebrities. DRC layers factoids, including how Iggy Pop earned high school valedictorian honors and how Dirthombs' lead man Mick Collins has a furry fetish. There's also Jack White beating the shit out of Von Bondies' singer Jason Stollsteimer in 2004. With its scriptlike format, Detroit Rock City doesn't draw any overarching conclusions, but it does one better: It makes you feel like you were in the scrum. - Kevin Curtin

#### I Dreamed I Was a Very Clean Tramp: An Autobiography by Richard Hell Ecco, 304 pp., \$25.99

The last decade has birthed many a punk rock autobiography: Dead Boys' Cheetah Chrome, D.O.A.'s Joey "Shithead" Keithley, Johnny Ramone, Patti Smith, Bob Mould. Richard Hell's might be the best of them all, and for the same reason Smith's Just Kids was so distinguished: Hell's a poet, his punkrock persona derived from consciously acting out Arthur Rimbaud's script. Much of Tramp's

#### The First Four Notes: Beethoven's Fifth and the Human Imagination by Matthew Guerrieri; Alfred A. Knopf, 368 pp., \$26.95

The first four notes of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony are among the most famous, most analyzed, and most persistently recognized patterns in music. Renowned classical music critic Matthew Guerrieri explores how such a tiny idea can inspire 200 years of debate, interpretation, and performance. The result mixes deep theoretical thought, socio-cultural history, and philosophy alongside anecdotes (including a great parenthetical about Brahms playing a joke on a Beethoven scholar), while remaining engaging and intellectually stimulating. The heaviest portion of music theory comes at the beginning, with a breakdown of how those four notes work, focusing on their tonal and rhythmic ambiguity, and the short-short-long pattern that forms the basis of the symphony's first movement. Then Guerrieri rumbles through its relationship to the French Revolution, spanning from lit-crit deconstructionist Jacques Derrida to Goethe and fate, and including Coco the parrot from Beirut's Hotel Commodore. Some readers might get bogged down in details, like the extended list of Hollywood films that feature the Fifth, yet Guerrieri grabs you and doesn't let go. The protagonist and main character remains this special musical idea, and you want to know its story. With two centuries of Beethoven books, a scholar has to look closely to find any unexplored corners. Guerrieri succeeds in doing just that. - Graham Reynolds

#### Days That I'll Remember: Spending Time With John Lennon and Yoko Ono by Jonathan Cott

Doubleday, 256 pp., \$25.95

No one will argue that John Lennon remains a cultural touchstone. More than 30 years after his assassination, the Beatle lives on as a household name amongst the children's children of anyone who actually bought Rubber Soul the day it hit shelves. In that sense, there's nothing terribly wrong with Days That I'll Remember, a warmly nostalgic memoir of one journalist's relationship with Lennon and his widow, Yoko Ono. Jonathan Cott interviewed the pair twice, in 1968 and again in 1980, mere days before Lennon's death, and he details the minutiae around those interviews with a genuine admiration of the artist. The John here is the John you thought you knew, though it's tough to justify a book about a cordial relationship with one of the most documented lives in pop history. If Days That I'll Remember feels comfortable in slightness, it's because Cott never stoops to vanity. Sweet, but pointless. - Luke Winkie





power derives from contrasting native Kentuckian Richard Meyers' bucolicunto-boring childhood and escape with fellow boarding school miscreant Tom "Verlaine" Miller to late-Sixties/early-Seventies bohemian New York City. Hell catalogs the various literary, musical, and

#### Harley Loco: A Memoir of Hard Living, Hair, and Post-Punk, From the Middle East to the Lower East Side

by Rayya Elias Viking Adult, 320 pp., \$27.95

Raised in the most glamorous spheres of Aleppo, Syria, during the Sixties as the baby of a doting family, Rayya Elias ended up living one hit to the next in NYC's East Village. The fatal flaw of her



memoir is her failure to fill in the gaps of that journey. The near-superstar stumbled upon promising careers as an art director at a swanky salon chain and as a New Wave bandleader, but Elias let her music and scissor-

slinging fall to the wayside when she became a junkie. The book's narrow focus on drug use neither illuminates her character nor paints a proper picture of the Lower East Side, a landscape she considers integral to the storyline. Similarly, the very thing she professes as a savior – her music – remains a bland subplot compared to vivid descriptions of dilapidated shooting galleries. What could have been a compelling narrative reads like a rambling transcript from a therapist's office. - Abby Johnston

#### It's Only Rock & Roll: Thirty Years Married to a Rolling Stone by Jo Wood

It/Harper Collins, 336 pp., \$26.99

The problem with autobiographies written by rock star wives, girlfriends, significant others, etc., remains the sound of one axe grinding. There's little difference in the stories: the exhilarating moment



when eyes meet, the passion, the rub of love. the thrill of rock & roll priming the wild ride of a celebrated lifestyle. Demons lure where the lethal hydra of drugs, alcohol, and sex dances to a 4/4 beat. Jo Wood practically invented the classic mold of rock wives - the fashion model who turns from arm candy and sweetheart to spouse - and she did it with the Rolling Stones' Ron Wood. She comes off likable and committed to her children, but also sometimes lost in the stage lights of the world's greatest rock & roll band. Both she and Ronnie fall victim to crack, though getting that out of their lives proved much easier than the neverending onslaught of women looking to bed a Stone. Despite the ultimate betrayal - her husband publicly taking up with a Russian teenager - Jo Wood takes the classier high road and gives her ex the thumbs up in the end. And it may have only been rock & roll, but she liked it. Liked it, yes she did. - Margaret Moser

#### The Doors Unhinged: Jim Morrison's Legacy Goes on Trial by John Densmore

**Percussive Press,** 296 pp., \$14.95 (paper)

Ironic that, upon my finishing this engaging account of the Doors' recent legal entanglements, the book's primary protagonist and band keyboardist Ray Manzarek succumbed to cancer. A visionary musician and



architect of the infamous L.A. quartet's psychedelic-jazz sound, Manzarek gets portrayed as a greedy, egotistical opportunist eager to parlay the group's music and image into financial gain. Enter drummer John Densmore, who invokes iconic frontman Jim Morrison's edict that all bandmembers have equal standing and veto power to quash, say, attempts to lease Doors' songs for commercial use or tour as "the Doors" without permission from all parties. While providing a few insights into the band's history, Unhinged scripts a courtroom drama in which Densmore and the Morrison estate sues Manzarek and guitarist Robbie Krieger, who then countersue Densmore. It's not pretty. Densmore protecting the Morrison/ Doors legacy sounds a tad self-righteous at times, but he provides excellent analysis of the nature and value of art and the constant struggle of both in commerce. Those looking for a definitive band history can turn to Densmore's Riders on the Storm or Manzarek's Light My Fire. - Jay Trachtenberg





Louder Than Hell bills itself "the definitive oral history of metal," and these interviews certainly demonstrate breadth. Revolver senior writer Wiederhorn and writer/radio producer Turman move through proto-metal, thrash, extreme metal, industrial, the so-called New American metal movement, and more, quoting seminal figures and unsung heroes alike. And yet, where this oh-so-serious book succeeds in scope, it falters in execution. Discussions of artistic development get swallowed up by explicitly - sometimes nauseatingly - detailed stories about the usual rock star indulgences. The constant litary of debauched episodes, recounted most eagerly by various hair metal, nu-metal, and metalcore mainstays, attests to the selfish, privileged lives these power-chord merchants lead. The tedious descriptions of bad behavior seem to indicate that the chief requirement to play metal is being an asshole. By contrast, The Merciless Book of Metal Lists revels in the cartoonish bad vibes and sneering irreverence associated with headbangers. Throwing down a gauntlet by insisting Kiss and Van




Halen aren't metal (sacrilege!), the authors slamdance through everything from "70 Songs About Metal" to "Thoroughly Embarrassing Metal Videos" and "Completely Unnecessary Heavy Metal Subgenres." Musicians contribute, too, though the best celebrity-related bit is "10 Reasons Dave Mustaine Probably Declined to Participate in This Book." Like most tomes of this ilk, The Merciless Book of Metal Lists blares a geeky hoot. - Michael Toland

The Billy Bob Tapes: A Cave Full of Ghosts by Billy Bob **Thornton & Kinky** Friedman William Morrow, 320 pp., \$16.99 (paper)




Friedman, a formidable author/songwriter/ raconteur in his own right, coaxes Thornton into a recording studio and lets him talk, transcribing the monologues into chapters that flow like Southern poetry. Tales of wildeyed, impoverished Southern youth in the Sixties and Seventies turn into teenage years spent playing in or roadie-ing for Southern rock bands, which gives rise to a Hollywood power player in anything-but-conventional fashion who uses said power to find an audience for his continuing musical ambitions. Friedman stays out of the way, instead inserting eyewitness testimonials by everyone from writing partner Tom Epperson to songwriter Dwight Yoakam, which make organizational sense of Thornton's monologues. Like everything else its subject and co-author touches, The Billy Bob Tapes rings real and true.

The Soundtrack of My Life by Clive Davis with Anthony DeCurtis Simon & Schuster, 608 pp., \$30 An extraordinarily successful music mogul, Clive Davis' single greatest triumph remains Whitney Houston. Rightfully, he spends a lengthy chapter discussing his interactions with the late R&B singer, noting his discovery and her resulting success. Beyond that, The Soundtrack of My Life is less autobiography than a chronicle of Davis' five

decades running the music business. When he finally gets to Houston midbook, his tales seem repetitive. What should be the most exciting part of his story ends up as lackluster as the majority of what he recalls. Taking the read-



er through helmsmanship of Columbia, Arista, and J Records, as well as his work with Dylan, the Grateful Dead, Alicia Keys, and American Idol winners, Davis' recollections rarely jump off the page, while his claims of influence on Janis Joplin, Paul Simon, Bruce Springsteen, and Patti Smith come across as self-aggrandizement. Though some of his youth gets aired. it isn't until the final chapter that Davis lets down his guard to discuss his personal life. That's something he does with a vigor that would've been welcome throughout the book.

My Life With the Turtles, Flo & Eddle,

#### Shell Shocked: My Life With the Turtles, Flo & Eddie, and Frank Zappa, etc. by Howard Kaylan with Jeff Tamarkin Backbeat Books, 304 pp., \$24.99

As lead singer of Sixties pop godheads the Turtles, half of Seventies rock satirists Flo & Eddie, member of Frank Zappa's Mothers of Inventions, and possessor of an eclectic résumé that's too massive to recount here, Howard Kaylan has enjoyed a wild, half-century ride that cries to be told in book form. Author of this brutally forthright account, he's the rare rock memoirist who's less motivated by self-aggrandizement and score-settling than by a relentless honesty and willingness to confront his own insecurities and flaws. The result is massively entertaining, frequently hilarious, and occasionally harrowing, vivid in its depictions of Kaylan's life and times, and unsparing in all manner of indulgences, infidelities, and dirty business dealings. Beyond the sex, drugs, and all-star supporting cast, it's Kaylan's unlikely saga of dogged persistence and showbiz survival that ultimately makes Shell Shocked a fascinating, and oddly inspiring, trip. - Scott Schinder

#### Springsteen on Springsteen edited by Jeff Burger Chicago Review Press, 428 pp., \$27.95

At South by Southwest 2012, Music keynote Bruce Springsteen spoke for 50 minutes, less than half as long as Quincy Jones' epic address three years earlier, but twice as rousing. Funny, insightful, and historic, it struck a literal "keynote" for "five days of bands [playing] hundreds of venues from morning 'til night." Missing his Moody siege that night smarts one scintilla less, because while his every live performance over 40 years makes up Springsteen's prodigious legend, his oration remains an altogether rarer resource. Subtitled "Interviews, Speeches, and Encounters," Springsteen on Springsteen closes with a transcript of his SXSW ballad, alongside a last-act cull of his induction of U2 into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, a Charlie Rose television interview, and celebrity sit-downs with Nick Hornby, Ed Norton, and Win Butler. By then, you've fallen in love with the Boss (he hates that nickname) all over again. Beginning with his first interviews in 1973 and arcing like one of his songs though every subsequent high and low, from Born to Run's backlash and Born in the U.S.A defense (with onetime Statesman critic Don McLeese) to his eulogy for Clarence Clemons in 2011, consider this the printed equivalent of the subject's sprawling Live/1975-85 collection: pure and unfettered. When a Jersey alt-weekly writer finds himself flying down the highway with Springsteen to the blare of Chuck Berry's "Maybellene" - "the speed, the music, the sun, the company. Jeezez Christ!" - so too will your hungry heart swell. - Raoul Hernandez

#### The King of Good Intentions by John Andrew Fredrick **Verse Chorus Press.** 272 pp., \$14.95


Lit professor by day, indie rocker by night. John Andrew Fredrick finally soundtracked his band the Black Watch's 1999 I.P. The King of Good Intentions. The novel stars John, a struggling musician trying to get his band off




the ground, teach Southern California middleschoolers, and nurture a relationship with his bandmate Jenny. Loquacious, overeducated, and snobbish in art, John's prone to rambling tangents, disregard for the fourth wall, and being led astray by his gonads. It doesn't take a grad student to know that last trait will jeopardize everything he's working to achieve. It's impossible not to read the story as autobiographical, even if you don't know Fredrick's history, including partnering with violinist and multi-instrumentalist J'Anna Jacoby, who went on to a session career with the likes of Rod Stewart. It's impressive Fredrick writes so candidly about his alter ego's bad decisions and self-absorption, and his eye for detail lends a real sense of you-are-there to John's POV. The prose sometimes wanders farther afield, but it's all to a purpose: John buries his dismay at the pain he's caused behind a wall of snarky commentary, which makes the abrupt ending ambiguous only if you haven't been paying attention.

#### Unknown Pleasures: Inside Joy Division **by Peter Hook** It/Harper Collins, 416 pp., \$27.99

Proto-electro, proto-goth, post-punk; whatever you called Joy Division, bassist Peter Hook seemed the leather-clad outrider. He was also their rock and biggest fan. From when their best reviews were for Hooky's hat to the transformation into New Order, he kept every receipt, ticket, and set list, pouring them from the tour bus onto the page. The death of Ian Curtis inevitably hangs over the tale, but Hooky doesn't attempt revisionism of the artist legend. Instead, he shows both sides of Curtis' coin, tortured genius versus the Northern English working-class kid who laughed at farts. The real meat is in the never-ending tension with his oldest ally and bitterest adversary, guitarist Bernard Sumner, aka Barney

Rubble. The Lennon and McCartney of the Eighties, they were the

band's basis and downfall. That's what Hooky understands: that Joy Division was all contradictions. The sound was exquisite but untrained. They couldn't always stand each other, but they'd smack anyone who crossed them. Keyboards were their success and downfall. Even how he wore his bass - slung low, in rock-god style - was accidental. It's what the Sex Pistols taught them: You don't have to be good to be great. - Richard Whittaker

#### 98% Funky Stuff: My Life in Music by Maceo Parker **Chicago Review Press,** 208 pp., \$24.95

"I just want you to blow, Maceo!" That was James Brown's exhortation to saxophonist Maceo Parker as he laid




into his solo on the bandleader's "Papa's Got a Brand New Bag." Not only is this 1965 smash often regarded as the birth of funk, it landed Parker on the musical map. The 70-year-old tenorman's slender memoir recalls his humble upbringing in Kinston, N.C. (where he still lives), his days marching in the college band, backing Marvin Gave before either of them were household names, and stints with Brown, George Clinton's Parliament-Funkadelic, and Prince. His years with the Godfather of Soul get the most attention; otherwise Parker skims over most aspects of his career without going into the kind of detail you might expect from so rich a musical life. A recording session for Keith Richards' Talk Is Cheap, for instance, nets just one paragraph. One notable exception is a heartfelt shout-out to his legendary three-day gigs at Antone's.

#### The Wrecking Crew: The Inside Story of Rock & Roll's Best-Kept Secret by Kent Hartman St. Martin's Griffin, 320 pp., \$15.99 (paper)

You've heard this story before, from



players who broke out and went solo (Glen Campbell, Dr. John, Leon Russell), you've likely never known their names. Author Kent Hartman walks readers through the studio's walls to exhaustive detail, opening with a story about the first time Campbell picked up a guitar somewhere in Arkansas, before relaying the specific emotions that led to every one of the Crew's phone calls and chord changes. Those recounts get laborious after the 15th or 50th dramatised control room conversation that could not have possibly gone to wit. By the time Phil Spector stops by, it's clear this wall of written sound could have been 60 pages shorter. - Chase Hoffberger

#### Anyone Who Had a Heart: My Life and Music by Burt Bacharach with **Robert Greenfield** Harper, 304 pp, \$27.99

Although Burt Bacharach's prose reads a tad less elegant than his sublimely sophisticated songs, Anyone Who



Had a Heart does exactly what a memoir by a veteran musician ought to do, surveying history and musical achievements with the benefit of insight and introspection gained through time, experience, and therapy. Indeed, those familiar with the songwriting icon's genial public persona and jet-set Sixties image may be surprised by his willingness to explore darker emotional territory here. Bacharach's refreshingly honest in accepting responsibility for professional and personal failures, employing the often illuminating device of allowing various exes, friends, and collaborators to chime in with their own recollections, not all of them complimentary, and some conflicting with Bacharach's own version of events. That said, deeper exploration of his star-crossed partnerships with lyricist Hal David (whom he admits to taking for granted) and vocal muse Dionne Warwick would've been nice. Despite that, what's here is consistently absorbing and informative, offering enough glimpses into Bacharach's character and creative process to make the book worthwhile.

Orestes De La Paz's exhibit at the Frost Art Museum in Miami in May recalled Chuck Palahniuk's novel and film Fight Club, in which lead character Tyler Durden's principal income source was making upscale soap using discarded liposuctioned fat fetched from the garbage of cosmetic surgeons (thus closing the loop of fat from rich ladies recycled back to rich ladies). De La Paz told his mentor at Florida International University that he wanted only to display his own liposuctioned fat provocatively, but decided to make soap when he realized that the fat would otherwise quickly rot. Some visitors to the exhibit were able to wash their hands with the engineered soap, which De La Paz offered for sale at \$1,000 a bar.

#### THE ENTREPRENEURIAL SPIRIT

As recently as mid-May, people with disabilities had been earning hefty black-market fees by taking strangers into Disneyland and Disney World using the parks' own liberal "disability" passes (which allow for up to five relatives or guests at a time to accompany the disabled person in skipping the sometimes hours-long lines and having immediate access to the rides). The passholding "guide," according to NBC's Today show, could charge as much as \$200 through advertising on Craigslist and via word-of-mouth to some travel agents. Following reports in the New York Post and other outlets, Disney was said in late May to be warning disabled permit-holders not to abuse the privilege.

After setting out to create a protective garment for mixed martial arts fighters, Jeremiah Raber of High Ridge, Mo., realized that his "groin protection device" could also help police, athletes, and military contractors. Armored Nutshellz underwear, now selling for \$125 each, has multiple layers of Kevlar plus another fabric called Dyneema, which Raber said can "resist" multiple shots from 9mm and .22-caliber handguns. He said the Army will be testing Nutshellz in August, hoping it can reduce the number of servicemen who come home with devastating groin injuries.

"Ambulance-chasing" lawyers are less the cliche than they formerly were because of bar association crackdowns, but fire truck-chasing contractors and "public adjusters" are still a problem - at least in Florida, where the state Supreme Court tossed out a "48-hour" timeout rule that would have given casualty victims space to reflect on their losses before being overwhelmed by home-restoration salesmen. Consequently, as firefighters told the South Florida Sun-Sentinel in May, the contractors are usually "right behind" them on the scene, pestering anxious or griefstricken victims. The Sun-Sentinel found one woman being begged to sign up while she was still crying out for her dog that remained trapped in the blaze.

#### **UNCONVENTIONAL TREATMENTS**

Researchers writing recently in the journal PLOS ONE disclosed that they had found certain types of dirt that contain anti-microbial agents capable of killing E. coli and the antibiotic-resistant MRSA. According to the article, medical "texts" dated back to 3000 BC mentioned clays that, when rubbed on wounds, reduce inflammation and pain.

Researchers writing in May in the journal Pediatrics found that some infants whose parents regularly sucked their babies' pacifiers to clean them (rather than rinsing or boiling them) developed fewer allergies and cases of asthma. (On the other hand, parental-cleansing might make other maladies more likely, such as tooth decay.)

#### **LEADING ECONOMIC INDICATORS**

Until recently, apparently, gene mutations were considered merely freaks of nature, but that was before Myriad Genetics obtained binding U.S. patents for mutations it discovered - now known as BRCA-1 and BRCA-2. Those mutations were in the news in May when actress Angelina Jolie announced that she had chosen to have a double mastectomy based on the presence of the cancercausing mutations, which she had learned of through a Myriad Genetics test costing about \$4,000. There is no price competition for the test, due to the patent, and Jolie, along with oncologists and OB-GYN doctors, fret that the test is too expensive for tens of millions of women around the world whose lives could be saved by knowing their status.

Archaeologists discovered in May that a construction company had bulldozed 2,300-year-old Mayan ruins in northern Belize - simply to mine the rocks for road fill to build a highway. A researcher said it could hardly have been an accident, for the ruins were 100 feet high in an otherwise flat landscape, and a Tulane University anthropologist estimated that Mayan ruins are being mined for road fill an average of once a day in their ancient habitats. Said another, "[T]o realize" that Mayans created these structures using only stone tools and then "carried these materials on their heads" to build them - and then that bulldozers can almost instantly destroy them - is "mind-boggling."

#### **FINE POINTS OF LAW**

A woman in Seattle's Capitol Hill neighborhood reported to a local news blog in May that she had seen (and her husband briefly conversed with) a man who was operating a "drone" from a sidewalk, guiding the noisy device to a point just outside a third-floor window in a private home. The pilot said he was "doing research" and, perhaps protected by a 1946 U.S. Supreme Court decision, asserted that he was not violating anyone's privacy because he, himself, was on a public sidewalk while the drone was in public airspace. The couple called for a police officer, but by the time one arrived, the pilot and his drone had departed, according to a report on the Capitol Hill Seattle blog.

## Soccer Watch BY NICK BARBARO

The **Austin Aztex** got untracked offensively in a big way this week, overwhelming the El Paso Patriots Saturday night at House Park, **8-0**, in front of a season-high crowd of 1,926, then beating Houston on the road Tuesday, 3-0. Westlake High product **Tucker Hume** hit two goals Saturday; last season's top scorer **Kris Tyrpak** got one in each game – those two are now tied for the team scoring lead with four goals each, and the Aztex, now 7-0 on the season, seem to be clicking really well as a team. They're on the road again at Oklahoma City this Saturday, then back home for the next three weekends – their last home games of the regular season: *Houston on June 29; West Texas, July 5; and OKC, July 13.* 

The **U.S.** moved much closer to **World Cup qualification** with a 1-0 win over Honduras Tuesday evening in Salt Lake City, finishing a sweep of their three June qualifiers, and pretty much silencing the doubters – for now. Overall, the Americans looked comfortable in possession, got great play on the wings, and created lots of scoring chances – albeit against teams that didn't put a lot of pressure on them. **Jozy Altidore** had the lone goal; he's scored in his last four games for the national team, tying an all-time U.S. record... Also on Tuesday, **Australia**, **Iran**, and **South Korea** each punched their tickets for **Brazil 2014**, joining **Japan** as Asia's entrants; qualifying play will resume worldwide in September.

The **Confederations Cup** is ongoing in **Brazil**: Held a year before the World Cup, the tournament is a kind of WC dry run for the top teams from each continent, and for the host country. For Brazil that's especially critical because they've got the **Olympics** two years after next summer's WC, and there's been a lot of trepidation, at home and abroad, about stadium construction, a balky transportation system, public safety, and various other civic infrastructure that's having a hard time keeping up with Brazil's rapid development.

So, **major riots** in all of Brazil's biggest cities is not the image organizers wanted to project. Yet there it is, the overwhelming message of the Cup, as seen on TV screens around the world: **the Brazilian people are pissed off** – not only have the promised public benefits connected with the games been delayed, scaled back, or cancelled, but the stadium construction costs, which were to be fully privately funded, have fallen instead on the overstretched government, at the expense of, you guessed it, social spending. A substantial bus fare hike on the eve of the games sparked the current riots. "We don't want the Cup," said **Camila**, a 32-year-old travel agent in São Paolo, quoted by Reuters. "We want education, hospitals, a better life for our children."

## **Much Ado About Nothing**

## The romantic banter in Joss Whedon's Much Ado About Nothing flutters and flirts as it navigates

the course of love that never runs smooth. It's a breath of fresh air in a dreary catalog of films based on Shakespeare's plays that either sag under the weight of the Bard's language, or sacrifice the poetry in those words in the pursuit of realness. Whedon has assembled a cast of familiar faces with unfamiliar names that perform this comedy with an insouciance that suits the film's contemporary setting and yet also respects its venerated source. The prose lilts trippingly on their tongues, relaxed and conversational. Notably, the actors in Much Ado

About Nothing aren't classically trained thespians specializing in Othellos or Juliets. Rather, they're Whedon's friends and colleagues, supporting players in his films (The Avengers) and cast members from his television series (Firefly.

Angel). It's remarkable how comfortable they appear in these roles.

Shot in just 12 days, the black-and-white Much Ado About Nothing is the antidote to Whedon's Marvel Comics franchise. (He's traded the blockbuster for the little movie, the superhero for Hero.) Set in an affluent, tree-lined Los Angeles suburb (Brentwood, perhaps?), the film takes place over the course of a weekend party in which the guests drink martinis, roast marshmallows, and conga late into the night. There's the occasional tryst, borne of lust or deceit or both. The men are handsome, all pronounced jawlines and Brooks Brothers

suits; the women are equally appealing in their summery fashions and casual elegance. It's a revelry to which many of us would love an invitation.

The focal couple in Much Ado About Nothing are Benedick and Beatrice, adversaries engaged in a "merry war" that belies the strong attraction each feels for the other. Their bickering is the stuff of Tracy and Hepburn or Gable and Colbert, though Acker and Denisof don't exude the star wattage that would bring their characters to the forefront at the

expense of the other players. Clearly, Whedon chooses to maintain egalitarianism amongst his troupe, faithful to the play's narrative. As in many of Shakespeare's comedies, dark moments mark the dramatic action

midway through Much Ado About Nothing. But Whedon brings the proceedings back to boisterous life in the last act, when the estate's night watchmen - looking like second-string Secret Service agents and behaving like Keystone Kops - reveal the treachery that threatens to spoil true love. Fillion's performance as the constable Dogberry in this section is the film's comic highlight. Wounded by an insult, his assbackward indignation achieves a droll momentum that will have you chuckling. All's well that ends well, indeed.

#### THE BLING RING

In her last three films - Somewhere, Marie Antoinette, and Lost in Translation - writer/ director Sofia Coppola has, with a steadily decreasing degree of success, examined the personal plight of the rich and famous. (I'd say emotional plight, but her last film, Somewhere featured a central character so dreary as to be utterly affectless.) The rich and famous are still front and center in The Bling Ring, but instead of remaining the subjects of the drama, they have become aspirational figures for the story's true protagonists. Fame and fortune are now packaged like obtainable commodities sold in perfumesized bottles from coast to coast, but it's the greater intangibles of the lifestyle that remain out of reach. The teen thieves at the center of The Bling Ring don't want to dress and smell like the celebrities they admire; they want to be the celebrities and the objects of admiration themselves.

Introspection, however, is not a matter of concern in The Bling Ring. Based on true events as told in a Vanity Fair article by Nancy Jo Sales, the film tells the story of a group of suburban Los Angeles teens who rob the homes of celebrities while they are out of town. They mostly steal totems of style and status to create pictures to post on their Facebook pages rather than pilfer items of great value to fence or trade. They are somewhat like a nonviolent version of the vacant kids portrayed in Spring Breakers (which was released with great success by the new distribution outfit A24, which is also releasing The Bling Ring). Only one member of the so-called Bling Ring could be said to be truly sociopathic, and that's their ringleader Rebecca (Chang), who graduates from thefts from unlocked cars to larceny from unlocked residences. Neither is it enough for Rebecca to simply steal: She always wants to lounge about amid the celebrity's possessions well after gathering the loot she plans to take with her. Perhaps the greatest surprise revealed in the film is the number of wealthy people who don't lock their cars and homes or toss the keys under the mat. As for the teen thieves, no surprises or insights are revealed.

The problem with The Bling Ring is that it feels as soulless as its young protagonists, and of course there's little sympathy to be found either for the story's über-rich victims like Paris Hilton and Lindsay Lohan. We learn very little about the group's motives and yearnings and why they, like us, are drunk on the scent of celebrity perfume, and why we have allowed it to permeate our culture. The Bling Ring mostly smells of rotten apples. - Marjorie Baumgarten

#### **MONSTERS UNIVERSITY**

Remember the nifty idea behind Monsters, Inc., wherein the city of Monstropolis was

powered by the shrieks of human children, mined by professional monster "scarers"? It put a face on the thing that goes bump in the night – a blue, no-neck giant named Sulley (Goodman) with a head like a fat thumb - and made a hero out of him, too. A dozen years later, the movie hasn't aged one lick, but this prequel - which jogs back to the college days of future Monsters, Inc. employees Sulley and Mike Wazowski (Crystal) arrives already stale. There's no invention here, no bold new strokes, only doodling on the dynamo concept of the first film. As for the actual brush strokes: My Monsters, Inc. Blu-ray renders images more vibrant and tactile than the dim, cruddy 3-D here.

Monsters University follows first-year Scaring School students Sulley and Mike, rivals and a study in contrasts: Sulley is all instinct and letterman charm, while Mike (he's the diminutive eyeball on stick legs) is book-smart but far from a natural. The script (by Robert L. Baird, Daniel Gerson, and director Dan Scanlon) has a couple of laugh-outloud moments (Muppet-voiced Charlie Day, as a nerdy wannabe scarer, delivers the biggest howler, even if it fits better on his It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia acid-comedy than in G-rated entertainment), and composer Randy Newman keeps the energy level high with his drumline-heavy score. But mostly this is shrugging stuff – clever but never inspired, dutiful but not possessing any of that ineffable magic of Pixar past.

Pity the kid tagged early as gifted and

talented; anything less than exceptional is labeled a fiasco. Would I chide Monsters University for mere competence if Pixar didn't have that first 15-year stretch of transportive animations on its transcript, before losing its shine with Cars 2 and the better-but-stillunderwhelming Brave? Probably not - I mean, it's not like Monsters University is a bad movie. Pandora's Promise is a fascinating documentary about nuclear power that argues it is the true green energy. It would be hard to imagine a film more controversial than this one. Sure to push opponents of nuclear power into all kinds of rages, the film insists that the strengths of nuclear power are underestimated and the weaknesses overstated.

The film regards nuclear power as an amazing and mostly positive energy source which can provide the clean energy that solar and wind power will never be capable of producing in sufficient quantity. Dismissing fossil fuels as dirty and dangerous, it finds that nuclear energy has many productive and necessary uses. Half the film argues for the effective use of nuclear power, and the other half argues against its bad press and consistently negative treatment. This includes defending Chernobyl and Three Mile Island as being not nearly as deadly or dangerous as believed.



Former anti-nuke spokespeople who have changed their positions are among the many talking heads in this film, which lends a very real depth and eloquence to the discussion. On the other hand, the anti-nuclear camp already has task forces busily attacking the points made by Pandora's Promise.

An amazing argument no matter which side of the debate you favor, Stone's film manages to restock and bring a fresh voice to an old controversy. The documentary is wellmade and articulately argued, although that doesn't mean it isn't going to have as many adversaries as champions.

Amazingly, this big-budget, zombie-apocalypse movie reveals little sign of its tumultuous production, which involved storied rewrites, re-shoots, and a six-month postponement of its original release date. World War Z comes across as a smart and ambitious horror movie, a bio-disaster film along the lines of Contagion or 28 Days Later. It's nail-bitingly tense at times, although these well-executed moments mix with others that are too much of a murky jumble to follow with any precision. (How much of the murk is due to the unnecessary 3-D, which always casts a pall over the screen image, and how much is due to the ineffectual direction of action by Marc Forster [Quantum of Solace,


Finding Neverland] is unclear to me from this viewing.) As for the zombies, they are terrifying for the most part, but at times they seem too much like a CGI fiction. I'm OK with World War Z's zombies being the fastmoving kind, but I don't understand why they arch their necks and emit cries that sound like a T. rex in pain.

Brad Pitt delivers an unshowy performance as Gerry Lane, a former U.N. investigator in worldwide trouble spots who has now retired from his life of danger for the merits of home and family. The filmmakers waste no time with character development before delivering the action, which turns out to be a good strategy in the film's opening moments but injurious later on when we're in greater need of a rooting interest. Nevertheless, the Philadelphia traffic jam that thrusts the Lane family into sudden zombie mayhem provides a fine introduction to the film and its villains. Gerry is called back into service by his old boss (Mokoena) and is given an ultimatum: His wife and two daughters will receive government protection only if Gerry flies to South Korea in an attempt to find the source of the international infection. The film has iust a few primary set-pieces; a military bunker in South Korea that looks like a spectral ghost town, the barricaded city of Jerusalem where zombies rush the wall as if it were Jericho, a W.H.O. research center near Cardiff that houses zombies in lab coats amid its antiseptic walls, an airplane on which snakes would have been a preferred relief from the zombie horde, and a Newark apartment building where the Lane family takes refuge before getting helicoptered out. Pitt is thrust into the classic role of the solitary hero who

vanguishes all enemies, but his Gerry Lane still seems an ordinary man who overcomes adversity with his wits rather than his brawn or exceptional physical prowess.

For all the PG-13 bedlam, World War Z seems less about the easy potential for worldwide annihilation than the valorization of the individual family as the core unit that interlocks our universe (witness the film's concluding freeze frame for evidence). When an epidemiologist remarks that Mother Nature is a serial killer, it seems clear who the real enemy is - and it may require matricide to win the day.

When their ship is destroyed by an unexpected asteroid storm, they crash into a nearby planet - Earth. Cypher's legs are damaged, so he stays behind and sends his son in pursuit of a rescue flare that remains with the other half of the damaged ship, 100 kilometers away. Kitai must battle the elements and the creatures of the wild, and face his past, too, in order to succeed in his mission. Often gorgeous, sometimes fascinating, but ultimately unwieldy and unsurprising, After Earth is an ambitious man-against-nature epic, but it fails as a Smith-family project. An intricate depiction of romance ripening with time, Before Midnight surpasses the two previous films in this trilogy in terms of its intelligence, narrative design, and vivacity: It's a grand accomplishment. The clan subscribes to a "let it all hang out" philosophy, but when Alejandro's Catholic birth mother arrives, the entire family must keep Mom and Dad's long-ago divorce a secret. Adapting from Jean-Stéphane Bron's 2006 source film Mon frère se marie, writer/director Justin Zackham perplexingly sidesteps the script's more fecund possibilities, instead flailing at frisky/edgy with some "risqué" bits that just come off as embarrassing, like your parents still clinging to "gettin' jiggy wit it" two decades too late. In this fifth sequel, professional outlaws Dominic Toretto (Diesel) and Brian O'Conner (Walker) are holed up in the extraditionfree Canary Islands, enjoying the spoils of Fast & Furious 5's epic heist. But when Dwayne Johnson's federal agent Hobbs shows up brandishing pictures of Dom's dead girlfriend Letty (Rodriguez) looking very much alive and in league with an international thief named Shaw (Evans), Dom swiftly reassembles his team. There is a plot – a clunky one, jerry-rigged with cliche-riddled dialogue and character motivations that amount to one long "huh?" - but who needs plot when we can have mayhem? Reviving the Heyerdahl mythos with mixed results, the film respectfully renders its 20th century explorer as an obsessed but genial everyman who seldom loses his composure. It's his unwavering resolve that keeps both the raft and the film on course. Kon-Tiki is an absorbing and often lyrical piece of storytelling that doesn't overembellish the facts or rely on whiplash editing to heighten the dramatic action. Austin-based writer/director Jeff Nichols smartly yokes Mud's hypermasculine stories - of blood feuds and gruff family men buckling under stress - to a soulful romanticism. As American independent film teems with so many shaky-cam snarksters, what an electric riposte to the status quo is Nichols, with his masterfully wide-vistaed eye for the epic and the elemental. #### THIS IS THE END

Self-referential to the max, This Is the End has its actors playing themselves. Jay Baruchel is visiting his old pal, Seth Rogen, in L.A. when they go to a party at James Franco's house, which is populated by a who's who of young Hollywood talent. Then the apocalypse arrives, and the partygoers, barricaded inside Franco's fortresslike dwelling, go into survival mode. Squabbles go on and on, the guys shoot a sequel to Pineapple Express to pass the time, and references to other films abound. The film's comedic strategy is definitely of the "let 'em all fly and see what sticks" approach. but it's amazing how adhesive so much of this is. (06/14/2013)





## The 'Chronicle' Cookout

### In the spring of 2006, a 24-year-old rapper named Leroy "Mr. Greezo"

Minor was cruising Sixth Street when he came upon "two white ladies that looked out of place" amongst a crowd that'd gathered outside Houston rapper Slim Thug's South by Southwest showcase.

"They said they worked in A&R for some label," Greezo, now 31 and a member of Austin's formidable League of Extraordinary G'z rap troupe, remembers. "I was like 'Oh, well shit, I'm a rapper,'" and I handed them this mixtape I was pushing. They were like, 'Where you from?' I told them I was from Austin. The lady just handed my CD back and said, 'Yeah, there's no rappers from Austin.'"

The plight of Austin's rap community is longstanding and more extensively covered than any one rapper this city has produced to date. Somewhere in the live music capital of the world, an entire genre, one currently at the height of its global influence and popularity, has been coldly left off the sampler of what Austin purports to offer.

Our scene's struggle for attention bears no correlation to its many talents, however. Acts like Greezo and his League, who've toured nationally with rappers Dead Prez and Rittz, and have a debut album three years in the making readied for release on INgrooves Fontana this fall, stand as proof positive of that. As do local products Kydd and Phranchyze, and relative newcomers 10YR, Krypol Haze, KB the Boo Bonic, and young guns Magna Carda. There's a reason why we hand-picked each act to star in the *Chronicle*'s inaugural *Chronicle* Cookout this Saturday: Even in the middle of summer, they're the ones leaving mics red hot.

"I firmly believe there are people in Austin who would support this if they knew about it," Greezo says. "That's my whole thing: Get out there and holler at people who may only support Score More shows or Transmission shows. We need to get those people to see that there are actually rappers in Austin who, for lack of a better term, are doing this on a national level."




#### ELEANOR FRIEDBERGER The Parish, Friday 21
