



NEW BUS IS A BAD DEAL

Dear Editor.

Capital Metro's new 801 bus is a more hightech and 50% more expensive version of the 101 bus that it replaces ["Here Comes MetroRapid," News, Jan. 24]. At 28 minutes from the Capitol to William Cannon, it is not significantly faster. MetroRapid takes two lanes of Downtown traffic out of service, and I fail to see how it will do anything to address Austin's traffic issues. To make the 801 viable, Cap Metro had to halve local bus service on South Congress. I do not think it is right that the new buses can manipulate the traffic lights. That feature will only make traffic worse for everyone who does not ride the

bus. The only reason Cap Metro is pursuing this project is because they received federal money to cover 80% of the cost, and it provided an excuse to dramatically raise fares. I am doing my part to make MetroRapid a financial failure by avoiding it and riding the 1 or 10 bus instead. Even though I live closer to Congress and ride the bus daily, I prefer to walk to South First instead of supporting the bendy bus. It is a bad deal both for transit riders and for drivers.

CAP METRO'S MADE IT HARDER

Dear Editor,

When I purchased my house nine years ago, one of the benefits was that I had two bus stops within a half-mile from the house, the 1 and 10 route. After a few bad experiences with late 10 buses, I skipped the 10 altogether for the 1 line. An example: I waited an hour for a 10 bus which then would not let me on. I walked to the 1 line and got on a bus in less than 15 minutes. I don't use the buses as much as I like as they tend to be unreliable. It's easy to get Downtown for events, but can be difficult to get back home. I ride the bus for SXSW concerts and fireworks, knowing that I will either have to walk home or take a taxi because there are not enough buses to handle

the amount of people. It's generally quicker to walk the three miles to my home than to wait for a bus that I can get on.

Yes, the 1 route is stinky and crowded, but it's nice to know that a bus will show up shortly. Now Capital Metro has reduced the frequency of buses coming to my local bus stop ["Here Comes MetroRapid," News, Jan. 24]. I could catch a 1 every 15 minutes, or at the very least every 30 minutes. Consolidating the 1M and the 1L has doubled my wait times. Yes, Cap Metro has given us the 801 option, but I have to walk twice as far to a bus stop and pay one and a half times what I would have paid. The bus system is less convenient and more expensive.

By increasing the amount of time I have to wait or walk, Cap Metro has made it much less convenient to take a bus. By reducing the amount of lanes on Lavaca and Guadalupe, Cap Metro has created a bottleneck on the South First bridge. While I commend Cap Metro for trying to help get people in and out of the city more efficiently, they need to remember those of us who already live in the city. We pay more to have convenience. We need to be able to get around in the city, if not by car, then by transit. If we can't get anywhere, our residences are no longer convenient and there is no point to remain in the city and pay the city taxes that keep the public transportation afloat. Cap Metro needs to consider transportation within the city when making route changes and not just transportation to the city.



Hard, Coal Reality

Breaking up with Favette Power is hard to do, officials say

Baby boomers aren't the only ones postponing retirement.

The long road to moving "Austin Beyond Coal," as the Sierra Club slogan goes, just got longer and more complicated. On Tuesday, utility officials delivered the grim news to the City Council

Committee on Austin Energy that severing the city's marriage to the coal-fired Fayette Power Project would carry a cost-prohibitive price tag.

Of course, this message of gloom-and-doom should have been anticipated long before Council won environmental plaudits in 2011 after signing on to a cheery pledge to phase out the plant by 2016, in accordance with an ambitious plan put forth by the Lone Star chapter of the Sierra Club. The promise to eliminate coal from Austin Energy's power generation portfolio also became an environmental centerpiece of Mayor Lee Leffingwell's re-election campaign in 2012, but, like the Council pledge, it lacked specifics on how the city would accomplish such a lofty goal.

Fast forward to 2014 and we hear a different tale of council members expressing remorse and frustration over the

> grim prospect of utility rates going up 5% to 25%, beginning in 2017, if the city were to unhitch itself from the plant before 2025. A more promising

scenario would require a federal carbon tax, which does not appear likely in the near term. If there's a bright spot to

this story, it's that AE has retreated on its recommendation of selling the city's share of the facility it owns with

the Lower Colorado River Authority. Environmentalists vehemently oppose the sale because the site east of Austin would still be emitting pollutants even if the city did wash its hands of coal.

At Tuesday's meeting, Khalil Shalabi, AE's vice president for energy market operations and resource planning, laid out a scenario that called for implementing a 2025 shutdown timeline in order to avoid a set of potential legal and financial tangles. By delaying closure, he said, "We would build up a reserve high enough that ... we could [retire the plant] and not affect rates."

Own It, Close It

An earlier breakup would also pose an assortment of other challenges because of the city's ownership arrangement with the LCRA - the two entities share equal ownership of two of the plant's three units (the third is owned solely by LCRA). But the Sierra Club's response is simple: "We want you to go out and gain ownership of one unit of the plant,"


- There's no City Council meeting this week, but look for plenty of pre-Valentine's Day love at the Feb. 13 meeting, when Council is set to approve dollars for several proposed affordable housing developments and for acquisition of water quality protection land. Slings and arrows will fly, too, in the form of occupancy limits for "stealth dorms" and other hot-button issues. See "Council Set to Tackle Stealth Dorms," p.24.
- ➤ A video of six men beating up two others near the corner of East Sixth and Brushy on Jan. 26 has gone viral on the website LiveLeak, prompting Austin Police Chief Art Acevedo on Monday morning to assure listeners of KLBJ-FM's Dudley and Bob Morning Show that he will "not rest until we catch those guys and bring them to justice." Acevedo said that he has already committed to dedicating 22 of 47 new police positions to beefing up police presence in the **Downtown** Area Command.
- ➤ Six people were arrested during a demonstration outside Travis County's Downtown jail, as part of a protest over the sheriff's participation in the federal deportation program known as Secure Communities. The protesters, who used dragon sleeves to lock arms, were charged with interference with public duties and criminal trespass for blocking the booking facility's sally port. Sheriff Greg Hamilton has said his office will continue to work with U.S. Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE), as is required by law.
- Travis County Commissioners approved a new contract with the Saxet Gun Show Tuesday, but they may have been firing blanks. The contract requires sellers conduct background checks for all sales, which Saxet flatly refuses to do.
- The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles voted Monday to deny clemency for Suzanne Basso, slated for execution on Wednesday evening. Feb. 5. Basso's attorney had argued, in part, that she is incompetent to face execution for the 1998 beating death of Louis "Buddy" Musso.
- Also Monday, lawyers for death row inmate Rodney Reed filed a motion with the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, asking that it reconsider its decision last month to deny Reed's latest bid to have his conviction overturned.
- On Wednesday, the Court of Criminal Appeals in a unanimous ruling denied death row inmate Larry Swearingen the opportunity for DNA testing on never-before-tested items of evidence, including two lengths of pantyhose alleged to be the weapon he used in 1998 to kill Montgomery County college student Melissa Trotter. - > Sen. Wendy Davis' recent media woes about how she wasn't enough of a single mom don't seem to be hitting her campaign finances. Her team announced she raised over \$900,000 in the first three weeks of January alone.

Dave Cortez, organizing representative for the Austin Beyond Coal campaign, told the council committee. "We know you guys have been surprised by some of the information you've received. We weren't; we knew this would be a very difficult process for you," he said, reminding Council that the sixth largest carbon emitter in the state - Fayette - "is sitting right down the road." He said the 2011 Bastrop wildfires and last Halloween's Onion Creek flood have resulted in an uptick of residents from the affected areas joining the Beyond Coal effort. "They understand climate change," he said. "We implore you to act on their behalf." He also encouraged Austin Energy and City Council to ramp up their outreach by providing more accessible meeting times to allow working families to attend public discussions on Fayette's closure.

Environmentalists have for years claimed that AE's long-term investment in renewable energy sources such as wind and solar should be weighed against not only the cost of purchasing coal, but the costs associated with coal's direct link to health problems and climate change. Even with AE and LCRA dumping some \$400 million into the installation of "scrubbers" to capture some pollutants, the scrubbers nonetheless fail to capture carbon.

Dirty Habits

According to data collected from the Sierra Club's Lone Star chapter, Fayette produces 75% of Austin Energy's carbon pollution and sucks an average of 5.75 billion gallons of water from the Colorado River each year. Add to those statistics the notion that Fayette - assuming the city will follow AE's 2025 recommendation will force the city to continue those dirty, wasteful habits for at least another decade.

Noting that the city is due this year to update its 2020 power generation plan, Council Member Chris Riley asked if AE officials foresee a more optimistic closure timeline if the cost of solar and wind keeps dropping. AE General Manager Larry Weis agreed that the utility needs to be "flexible and nimble" whenever the market shifts up or down, but said he felt more comfortable sticking with a 2025 plan. The utility will, however, stay on course to begin winding down Fayette in 2020, as laid out in the city's existing climate protection goal.

CM Kathie Tovo asked why it would take AE more than a decade to close Favette when other cities have committed to shuttering their coal plants - as San Antonio aims to do in 2018 - without officials projecting dramatic rate hikes.

AE's Shalabi surmised that those entities probably have the cash balances required and their debt low enough to accomplish such a task. And that's just what the utility is positioning itself to do - build up the utility's reserves and bring down the debt to allow for closure without adverse consequences. It's just going to take longer to get to that point.

Point Austin will return later this month.

AISD Going Out on a Limb

SINGLE-SEX SCHOOLS AREN'T ALL THEY'RE CRACKED UP TO BE

Okay, ready for school? Girls on this side, boys on the other. And here are your separate buses to your separate schools.

If you didn't know - and it seems that a lot of people don't - next fall, the Austin Independent School District will be opening two single-sex schools. Pearce and Garcia **Middle Schools** will merge their attendance zones, and then split their student bodies along chromosome lines - girls to Pearce, boys to Garcia. It's all part of a panoply of reforms in East Austin this year (see "The Next Round of School Reform," p.26), but there's a big problem. After all that effort and stress of redesigning the education of thousands of kids, the predominance of research says single-sex education will bring no gain.

This week, Psychology Bulletin, the journal of the American Psychological Association, published an article entitled "The Effects of Single-Sex Compared With Coeducational Schooling on Students' Performance and Attitudes: A Meta-Analysis." In a statement, report co-author Janet Shibley Hyde, who directs the Center for Research on Gender and Women at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, wrote, "Proponents of singlesex schools argue that separating boys and girls increases students' achievement and academic interest. Our comprehensive analysis of the data shows that these advantages are trivial and, in many cases, nonexistent."

This is a large-scale study, a meta-analysis synthesizing the results from 184 studies covering 1.6 million children in 21 nations, and the results are pretty clear. It breaks down the various academic reports used into two categories, uncontrolled and controlled. The uncontrolled, which used looser modeling, showed marginal improvements in math performance and none in science achievement. The controlled group, which used more rigorous methodologies, showed no improvement. Moreover, single-sex schooling did nothing to motivate kids to stay in school or care about their education.



A SAFE HAVEN?

There's one sentence of particular interest to Austinites in the article's abstract: "Claims that [single-sex] schooling is particularly effective for U.S. ethnic minority boys could not be tested due to the lack of controlled studies on this question." According to the article, one of the core arguments made by single-sex proponents is that "biological and social psychological perspectives make single sex schooling particularly effective for low-income African American and Hispanic boys." But that's not exactly why AISD is futzing with Pearce and Garcia.

It's effectively at the behest of one board member: District 1 Trustee Cheryl Bradley. Basically, she heard what the district said it achieves at its existing single-sex campus, the controversial Ann Richards School for Young Women Leaders, and she wanted that for East Austin. Yet, as I wrote in 2012, "Bradley's plan is not simply about gender. It's about creating what she sees as a safe haven for minority kids. She said. 'You're going to have to learn to navigate this city, being an African-American male and being a Latino male, and that's just it."

The problem for the district is threefold. One, it is going out on a limb with no academic evidence to support its reform. Two, it is putting two communities through yet more reforms, and if Austin education advocates know anything, it's that the worst thing for schools is constant upheaval. Case in point: Pearce, which was slammed between closure and threats of closure and repurposing for years. Three, the community doesn't support single-sex schools. That's part of why voters rejected **Proposition 4** – which included the funds for an additional districtwide boys' academy - in 2013.

Yet AISD is pushing on with this change. It's hard not to at this point. Senior staff are hired, they're already doing the sales job to convince parents to send their kids to the new campuses, and, most tellingly, the district is making alternative preparations at surrounding middle school campuses for when families decide that single-sex schooling just is not for them.

DÉJÀ VU

Funny thing is, we've been here before. In 2011, UT researcher Rebecca Bigler coauthored a study for Science, the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, entitled "The Pseudoscience of Single-Sex Schooling" (see "Uncontrolled Experiments," Dec. 9, 2011). Unsurprisingly, it shows results similar to the new Wisconsin-Madison report. However, it adds one significant component to the conversation. While the Psychology Bulletin paper pooh-poohs the idea of any benefits from teaching boys and girls differently, the Science study goes further, noting that "there is evidence that sex segregation increases gender stereotyping and legitimizes institutional sexism."

So, to sum up: the AASA and now the American Psychological Association have, through peer-reviewed studies in their leading publications, effectively come out against single-sex schooling. But we're going to go down this path anyway, and that's arguably the most maddening part of this process.

Club 'Stacking' = Democratic Drama

Austin's Democratic clubs are the smallest building-blocks in the political firmament that determines the result of local elections, so it may surprise some that their internal disputes are among the most heated in the whole system. Look no further than the controversy that has engulfed local clubs in the last two weeks over endorsements in two hotly contested county races – the slugfest between **Andy Brown** and **Sarah Eckhardt** for Travis County Judge, and the three-way contest between **Brigid Shea**, **Richard Jung**, and **Garry Brown** for Commissioners Court Precinct 2.

Much of the controversy is over a political tactic called "packing" or "stacking," which involves filling an organization with your own loyalists to help win an endorsement. Austin's Democratic clubs are, at least hypothetically, supposed to be filled with involved, conscientious members who rally around issues or ideology, and stay with the club for the long term. With the small membership of many clubs, though, a small number of new members can help tip an endorsement vote. And given that clubs require voting members to pay dues, candidates will sometimes pay for the cost of a membership.

Stacking is a time-honored component of the political strategist's toolkit. In **Robert Caro**'s *The Path to Power*, a chronicle of **Lyndon B. Johnson**'s early years that has Talmudic power for the politically inclined, LBJ used it repeatedly in the Twenties to install his loyalists in student government while in college in San Marcos. But some are saying that stacking is more of a problem today than it's ever been. Depending on where one stands, it's either a healthy and inseparable part of the game, or a mortal threat to the democratic process that must be destroyed.

The conflict is most heated in the Precinct 2 race, where Shea and Brown are increasingly criticizing Jung's campaign for stack-







ing, while Jung's supporters say the tactic is fair game and reflects support for their candidate. Jung has appeared to be pulling second behind Shea in the three-way race, but has won a large number of club endorsements recently, including some that have surprised observers. His campaign won the endorsement of the **Austin Tejano Democrats** after paying for 20 memberships in the club, despite ATD's core support of the 10-1 City Council redistricting plan, which Jung opposed.

After Jung won a number of club endorsements Jan. 30, attention turned to the **Central Austin Democrats** and **University Democrats**, two groups that meet together on UT's Forty Acres. For decades, the two groups have fused their endorsements into something called the **Austin Progressive Coalition**, a weightily named organization that confers certain resources and volunteer benefits to candidates that win both groups' support.

CAD president **Glen Coleman**, fielding complaints from people watching what was going on in other clubs, proposed a change

in the rules Friday, Jan. 31, before CAD/UD's joint endorsement meeting and candidate forum on Saturday. As it happens, membership in the UDems is restricted to those affiliated with UT – but CAD's membership is open to anyone living in Central Austin, meaning UT students can join both clubs and vote twice. Coleman announced on Facebook he wouldn't be giving CAD ballots to UDem members, eliminating the possibility of double-voting.

That set off a firestorm, with a torrent of people accusing Coleman, and the anonymous complainers, of attempting to disenfranchise students – and decrying the sportsmanship of changing the rules the day before an endorsement meeting. Glen Maxey, a CAD member and former state rep, wrote that he found the newfound interest in membership rules naive. "Packing of clubs before endorsements," he wrote, "is the way campaigns work. It's like registering voters before an election."

By the time the clubs met at noon that Saturday – K.T. Musselman, who works for

the Jung campaign, implored supporters to meet "tomorrow at high noon" to oppose "this last-minute, unannounced, anti-democratic, and anti-student rule" – passions were running high. Coleman appeared defensive as he tried to explain the reasons he had proposed the policy change. Maxey took to the floor to tell attendees the CAD constitution was unambiguous in allowing all residents of Central Austin to vote, and promised that he would "fight to my dying breath to keep students from being disenfranchised."

Chuck Herring, who chaired the Travis County Democratic Party in the Eighties,

rose to describe the stacking process as a net positive. "It's good for the clubs," he said, emphasizing the boost to participation and club finances. "Usually the people who complain about bringing new people into clubs are the people who can't do it as effectively."

Others, though, railed against the intensity of the stacking. Campaign consultant David Butts told the audience he was "quite frankly ashamed" of what had become of the club, adding that "a group of enterprising political consultants who may or may not be paying these people want to game the endorsement," something which threatened to end the "unique system" behind the Austin Progressive Coalition.

That's something Huey Rey Fischer, a former UDem president, was having none of. "If you want to do this in the middle of a primary, when we're trying to move forward for 2014, that's your game, David Butts," he said. "All of these arguments are red herrings." But Fischer, who's pulling for Garry Brown, later admitted that he'd "seen a lot of University Democrats here I've never seen before, and they're all wearing Jung stickers."

CAD ultimately approved a review committee to look at stacking, and the dual-vote issue, but the attempt to change the rules at "high noon" was defeated easily. One of the few to stand in favor of the rule change: Eckhardt, who, despite paying for quite a few CAD memberships herself, lost the UDems/CAD/APC endorsement to Andy Brown. Also winning that endorsement: Jung and County Treasurer candidate Ramey Ko. Jung and Ko practice law

together and share a campaign manager, Mykle Tomlinson.

Members of the Jung campaign point to Shea's inability to win the CAD endorsement as evidence of weakness on her home turf. Shea says that's nonsense. "I think it's an indication that campaign consultants will go to great lengths to get endorsements," she said when asked about the day's events, saying that the endorsements are "not at all" significant in the broader scope of the campaign. Is it unethical? "Yes. I think that when you have so many clubs either acting or discussing the need to examine their bylaws," Shea says, "it speaks volumes."

Whatever the significance, the issue seems set to rumble on. At a Women for Good Government forum on Monday, the candidates were asked about stacking.

Garry Brown, who opened by disclosing that he had gotten in on the game in a minor way by paying the membership dues of five unpaid interns who were members of UDems, said the scale of the Jung operation was troubling. When he decried the "other candidates in this race who have spent hundreds of dollars to block either Brigid or I from getting endorsements," Jung interjected: "You can say my name," prompting laughter from the crowd.

Brown continued: "I understand that the rules allow this sort of thing. But just because you can doesn't mean you should." But Jung seemed to be banking that his burgeoning list of club endorsements was worth the tactic. "We're all running hard campaigns," he said. "And I've abided by the rules." - Christopher Hooks

The results may have been controversial, but that hasn't stopped the Dem candidates in Travis County from showing off the new feathers in their cap. The 'People's Court' PRO-POT CANDIDATE ENTERS JP RACE

The way attorney **James Braxton Forrest** sees it, Travis County's Justice of the Peace, Pct. 5, is a place not just to hash out old disputes, but a place to chart a progressive course for Austin's future.

He's not talking about making new court rules (per se), or about modernizing the court's website. Instead, Forrest looks at JP 5 and sees a place to take a stand – on a variety of issues, including racial profiling, marijuana legalization, and gay marriage.

Forrest is bringing these ideas to his first bid for public office, an attempt to unseat 14-year-veteran JP **Herb Evans**, whom Forrest will challenge in next month's Travis County Democratic primary; because there is no GOP contender, it is a contest that will, in effect, decide who takes the bench in the general election.

The county's five JP courts are, in essence, the "people's courts," where judges handle all manner of cases, including small civil claims and minor criminal infractions. Indeed, for JP 5, that includes adjudicating tickets handed out for a smattering of low-level criminal charges, including possession of small amounts of marijuana. Under a 2007 state law, police can opt not to arrest individuals found in violation of seven low-level nonviolent crimes, including pot possession. The law, known as cite-andrelease, allows police to issue a citation for those infractions instead of making an arrest and booking a person into jail. And in Travis County, all such citations are processed through JP 5.

By all accounts, the law has been successful. In Travis County, the citation option has averted more than 21,000 individuals from jail, says Evans, including more than 5,000 in 2013.

When you consider the time it takes police to arrest and then book someone into jail – Evans uses a modest estimate of 2.5 hours per arrest – in 2013 alone that meant saving 12,500 man hours, time that officers can spend on patrol. "That's a staggering number of hours," he said – indeed, it's the equivalent of putting six full-time officers on the streets.



But as Forrest sees it, keeping people out of jail is not enough. He says he would use his power to ignore marijuana-related tickets – allowing for the cases to be dismissed as a means to, in effect, legalize marijuana possession in Austin. "I think the country is moving toward [legalization] and I'd like Austin to be pushing for that," said the 38-year-old.

Forrest said he believes that minorities are too often profiled by police and are overrepresented even in minor criminal cases – and that although minor pot possession may be eligible for only a ticket, any conviction stays with a person and could cause collateral damage (with housing, employment, or education, for example) in the future. He believes that probable cause for each citation should be throughly vetted, and he questions whether Evans has done so. (Forrest said that while he would consider each charge on a case-by-case basis, the "presumption" would be "that I'm going to dump all" pot cases.)

"He's entitled to take his position," says Evans. But he disagrees that the job of JP should be used in this manner. "We have free speech in this country and I don't have any problem with that," he said. "I've taken an oath and I have a responsibility to the law and I can't pick and choose at my level what laws I want to enforce."

Indeed, Evans said that since cite-and-release passed the Lege in 2007, he's worked closely with all area law enforcement agencies to get buy-in for the law and to put in place the policies that have ensured its success. He agrees that minorities are overrepresented in the criminal justice system - "that's certainly true; it doesn't take a genius to figure that out," he said - but suggests Forrest's approach is naive. He's says he's worked hard for more than a decade to do what he can to improve the system - for example, by advocating, along with his colleagues, for the Austin Independent School District to handle truancy and other minor infractions within the district instead of sending kids to court (which is now happening, due to a policy change at AISD, he said). During his tenure in the court, "I've tried to figure out this job," he said. "I've thought about it and have tried to make improvements."

Forrest doesn't believe Evans has done enough and says that as JP he would push hard for social change – including holding a mass same-sex wedding outside the courthouse. He acknowledges that because gay marriage isn't legal in Texas, whatever ceremonies he performs would be symbolic, but feels that's important. "That symbolism is going to be amazing," he said. "It would be a dream come true."

Forrest says he knows his platform points may seem fringe – in addition to "legalizing" pot possession and promoting same-sex marriage, he also believes criminal charges for 18- to 20-year-olds in possession of alcohol should be eliminated – but he believes they're issues that resonate with Austin and its bohemian identity. "Same-sex marriage and legalizing weed. Why not?" he asks. – *Jordan Smith*

Is the City Trying to Bust the Firefighters Union?

Deputy City Manager Michael McDonald would not comment on negotiations with the DOJ.

Austin Firefighters Association President Bob Nicks says he was surprised last week to see listed on the City Council's meeting agenda an item that would have them approve a consent decree with the U.S. Department of Justice to define how hiring for the city's fire department will proceed into the near future.

It wasn't as though he was unaware the DOJ had been looking into whether the department violates federal antidiscrimination laws in its hiring practices - the DOJ announced its intention to do so in an April 2013 letter to the city's legal department - and the AFD is not alone among U.S. fire departments that have struggled with recruiting and hiring minority and female cadets.

What he did find surprising, however, was that city management was apparently ready to wash its hands of the issue, giving the federal government the power to devise a new hiring process, one that would attempt to overcome decades of paltry minority candidate hiring. Indeed, according to Nicks, the DOJ was surprised by the decision, too - that's what he said representatives of the agency indicated during a four-hour meeting with union officials on Tuesday, Jan. 28, just two days before Council would be asked to sign off on a plan – one that Nicks says hasn't even been finalized.

The decision to put the matter before Council was additionally troubling to Nicks since it wasn't until the week before that the AFA finally received documents, as part of an open records request made to the city, that reflect that the city's most recent hiring process, in 2013, generated a candidate list that is the most diverse in the department's history. According to the Aug. 6, 2013, email from David Morris, a management consultant hired to administer the firefighter candidate testing process, out of the top 100 candidates for the department's open positions, 42 are white, 23

are Hispanic, 13 are African-American, and 12 are female. "I am pleased to report that there is no adverse impact against any protected group" of candidates, Morris wrote to AFD Chief Rhoda Mae Kerr and other city staff, including legal staff. "The diversity for African-Americans within the first 100 candidates actually exceeds parity of the number of African-Americans applying and significantly exceeds diversity of African-Americans in the City's population," he continued. "These positive numbers represent the results of

all of the dedicated work that you and your department and the Association have committed to this effort."

Nicks wonders how, with such a diverse candidate pool ready for hiring, it makes sense for the city to concede that the hiring process is discriminatory and needs remedying. The results clearly show that a previous problem with candidate testing in 2012, devised by another consultant, has been remedied, Nicks said. In that instance, an administrative error may have skewed the results of the test; by shortening the 5 test from 2.5 hours to just 2 two, the testing instrument was invalidated, resulting in ≤ otherwise-qualified candidates being cut from the list of those who could be hired. It was an unfortunate outcome, but not one that was intentionally discriminatory. (A potential remedy is either to hire or to compensate injured candidates.)

Ultimately, the item - authorizing the city to enter into a consent decree - was pulled from the council agenda and postponed until late February. Nicks said he hopes council members will take the opportunity to ask serious questions about why city management is pushing for a decree when the evidence supports the union's contention that the merit-based hiring process is considerably improved, and that any negative impact of the 2012 process was the result of an administrative decision and not an attempt at deliberate discrimination.

Deputy City Manager Michael McDonald declined to comment on negotiations with the DOJ, why the city had not provided the DOJ with the 2013 testing results, or why the item was placed on the agenda before those results were released and before negotiations had been finalized.


Ultimately, Nicks is concerned that the entire episode is a result of city management trying to bust the firefighter union. During contract negotiations in 2008, the city told the union that it wanted "unfettered hiring" authority, Nicks recalls. If the union wouldn't agree, the city said, it would wait for a complaint about unfair hiring to be filed, would then offer a "weak defense" to the complaint and would agree to a consent decree - a circumstance that would strip from the union's contract any ability to influence hiring practices. The union voted down that contract. The contract the union and city ultimately did agree on contained the hiring provisions that resulted in the diverse 2013 candidate list. Nonetheless, during contract negotiations last spring the city again pushed for unilateral hiring authority, prompting contract negotiations to reach an impasse. (The firefighter contract expired in October, 2013.) Now, the city appears to be pushing for the consent decree, just as it said it would five years ago, Nicks said. "I think it's a union-busting move, what they're doing. They're basically blaming the hiring process on the union," and it appears the groundwork to do so was laid back in 2008. "I'm not saying it necessarily connects all the dots, but it's pretty close."

Nicks said the union is now waiting for the DOJ to release information that would support any provisions included in a consent decree. "At this point we're not approving of a consent decree," he said, but the union remains optimistic that there will be a way to sort things out so that the government and the union can "meet our mutual demographic goals." - Jordan Smith

Council Set to Tackle 'Stealth Dorms' Next Week



There's no City Council meeting this week. but a draft agenda for the Feb. 13 meeting is already filling up with some potentially contentious items.

One long-simmering controversy in Central Austin is the growing presence of "stealth dorms" in neighborhoods near the UT campus. Parking issues are one chief complaint coming from residents who live in these neighborhoods. A public hearing will precede possible Council action on a proposal to limit occupancy to no more than four unrelated adults in single-family-zoned properties (Item

GelinAbaci.

Council will hear testimony and possibly vote Feb. 13 on proposed occupancy limits for single-family zoned properties.

73). The changes would apply citywide. But such amendments to the ordinance - which currently limits occupancy to six unrelated adults per household - also raises concerns about affordability for tenants in Austin's increasingly out-of-reach rental market. Expect to hear sound arguments from both sides.

The stealth-dorm matter will be preceded by a hearing on a proposal that would allow breweries to sell alcoholic beverages produced onsite for onsite consumption (Item 72).

Council will also consider approving several loans - including a \$333.829 business loan to Richard Kooris and Dennis McDaniel (operating as 11E5 LLC), who aim to renovate existing property at 1100 E. Fifth to create a year-round farmers' market in the Saltillo neighborhood (Item 10). Kooris, a filmmaker, also runs 501 Studios in East Austin.

Other loans would go to Foundation Communities (conditional on the award of tax credits by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs) to build two new affordable housing rental projects and to expand an existing multifamily development. Council may also approve a similar housing development loan to DDC Merritt Lakeline Station (Items 15-19).

Council is also set to approve \$7.5 million in bonds to acquire a 352-acre site in Hays County for designation as water quality protection land. The acreage along Onion Creek is in the recharge zone and is considered one of the more environmentally sensitive areas of the Edwards Aquifer (Item 20).

LAST WEEK ...

As expected, Council approved close to \$700,000 in incentives over a 10-year period for Massachusetts-based AthenaHealth to expand its medical presence in Austin, taking up quarters at the decommissioned and redeveloped **Seaholm Power Plant** on the north shore of Lady Bird Lake. The vote was 5-2 with Council Members Laura Morrison and Kathie Tovo dissenting on grounds that the city shouldn't have to incentivize companies to come here when Austin is already experiencing an economic boom like no other.

Council also gave Little Woodrow's bar on Burnet Road the right to serve alcoholic beverages, despite neighborhood opposition. Morrison, Tovo, and Chris Riley were on the losing end of a 4-3 vote. - Amv Smith

You want the house. I want to help.



The Next Round of School Reform

AISD focuses again on Eastside schools

There's a consensus in the Austin Independent School District: The schools in East Austin should get the same opportunities, and achieve the same results, as those in any other part of town. That official and public consensus has been in place for decades - yet the district is seemingly no nearer to that goal. Occasionally, one campus beats the system, but its success never seems to spread to the neighboring schools. Yet with four campuses going through the process of reform and restructuring over the next couple of years, the district is hoping that it can finally start lifting everyone.

The core problem is a perception that AISD treats East Austin differently from the rest of town. While the administration constantly touts how much money it invests in Eastside schools, the educational return on investment is questionable. Vincent Tovar, lead organizer for community education advocates Pride of the Eastside, sees AISD falling down on its commitment to educate the whole child, instead of constantly triaging East Austin campuses to get them through the next round of state assessments. He said, "Arts are being taken away, testing is increasing, and they're getting kids away from speaking Spanish. That gets test results, so why do anything else?"

That's why the district is finally pushing towards a more holistic approach to campus overhaul. AISD Board President Vince Torres called it "the East Austin plan, which isn't a plan per se, but looking at each school and trying to address all the needs at all the schools." However, years of fiddling with individual campuses have proven that the big challenge is not fixing any one school, but creating a coherent feeder pattern, from pre-K through graduation. Torres said, "Until you strengthen that vertical team and get it aligned, you can do all the work in the world but you're not moving anywhere."

Four campuses are at the heart of this lat-

est round of reforms. Allan Elementary lies mostly empty ever since it was closed in 2013. Pearce and Garcia Middle Schools are popular and increasingly successful, but suffer from low attendance; and Eastside Memorial High School has been through the meat grinder of closure and restructur-

ing more than any other campus in Austin. Yet all four face radically different futures. AISD is currently asking the community to examine a handful of options for Allan, most of which are aimed at creating a specialty middle school. Next fall, Pearce and Garcia will convert into single-sex campuses, with their attendance zones merged to cover much of East Austin. Over at Eastside, the district is in the first year of a partnership with Johns Hopkins Talent Development Secondary to build up not 1100 SOO PM Eastside Memorial High School at the Johnston Campus

just the high school, but its entire vertical team feeder pattern into a STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) hub. In isolation, any of these would be a major task for the district. Combined, they represent one of the biggest concerted pushes to change schooling east of I-35. AISD Chief Schools Officer Paul Cruz argues that, although the tactics may change, the strategy remains the same. "What's continued is

> the focus on student performance. It's about the improvement of the academic design and instructional delivery."

> For Drew Scheberle, Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce's Senior Vice President of Education and Talent Development, there's a simple truth: Struggling schools in East Austin can make the grade. Take Reagan High. For years it was on a fast track to closure. Then, with the right leadership, the right programs, and the right staff, it edged back from the

brink. "Reagan has turned a real corner," Scheberle said. He credits Principal Anabel Garza (see "On Having Heart," Feb. 17, 2012) with much of the success, such as working with Austin Partners in Education for a grant to provide more dual credit courses. "Those kind of things were not even remotely possible before she started."

Part of the struggle for AISD is in educating parents that their neighborhood schools

are still an option. At last estimate, around 5,000 high school students within AISD's boundaries had transferred to charter or private schools, and they're not coming from the high-achieving schools in West Austin. "Most of the charter schools have been growing up on the Eastside," said

Scheberle; he argues that a successful campus can woo those kids back. Again, he uses Reagan as an example: "It wasn't more than two or three years ago that they had 700 students, and now it's up to 1,100 or 1,200."

Part of the recruitment challenge for a successful school targets parents, the rest targets students. For example, Cruz said, last semester the district started an outreach program for Pearce and Garcia, with the newly selected principals visiting both classrooms and community meetings at surrounding elementaries such as Harris, Sims, and Pecan Springs, "letting them know about the activities and academic offerings at Pearce and Garcia." That way, he said, "Fifth-graders are going to know what sixth grade looks like."

Shifting Demographics

There's an added complication. The East Austin of 30 years ago - or even 10 years ago - is not the East Austin of today: The traditional blue collar, majority-minority population has faced the arrival of an increasingly diverse, younger, and often (but not always) wealthier population. Austinites may debate the merits and perils of gentrification, but the reality is that residents, whether they were born into a community or moved there a week ago, are entitled to send their kids to the same neighborhood schools. Moreover, that may be the only way those schools stay open. Tovar is no fan of gentrification and its impact on education ("you can't be optimistic about the future of your neighborhood school when the city is selling off what it means to be in Austin") but he also understands that the district has to serve and attract both populations. He said, "AISD needs to step up their outreach on quality."

Those changing demographics create a new conundrum around school accountability. Education Austin's Ken Zarifis is particularly concerned that, if AISD goes on to proclaim the successes of any of these

reforms, they are very careful that they're talking about the same students, especially with a divisive model like single-sex campuses. He said, "If we have an exodus of kids moving in and an exodus of kids moving out because their parents like the model, can we compare that to results at Pearce and Garcia right now?"

Of course, none of this comes for free. These reforms come at a very volatile time for school budgets, as Judge John Dietz has reopened his hearings into the constitutionality of the Texas public school finance system. That means AISD is unsure how much money, long term, it will have for these campuses and the programs that support them. For the past few years, the district has depended on the REACH incentive pay program to hire and retain successful teachers for struggling campuses. The program, which covers 38 district schools, provides stipends to teachers for reaching specific objectives in professional development and student results, ranging from \$500 for peer observation to \$3,000 for meeting the targets for two student learning objectives. Since

first piloting the program in 2010, the district has paid out \$41 million, and will expand to more campuses in the 2014-15 school year.

The consensus is that it works, but there's no miracle. It's just a way to keep teachers from leaving for better paying jobs in other districts. Zarifis called it a "Seventy million dollar investment in the Eastside, but it didn't get much attention because it wasn't controversial." However, much of that cash came from a federal Teacher Incentive Fund grant, and that's set to expire at the end of the 2014-15 school year. "That's the problem with grants," said Zarifis. "They have a shelf life."

Nor do the historic educational needs of East Austin stop at I-35. Zarifis taught at Burnet Middle School in North Austin for years, and saw exactly the same issues -

poverty, families chasing cheap rents, low English-language skills - that he sees in East Austin. Similarly, just as REACH was primarily designed to help East Austin campuses, it has also helped campuses across town. If the district does revise it, he said, "Rather than it being a program-based or grant-based opportunity, I'd like to see something more structural."


Three Plans for Four Eastside Schools

EASTSIDE MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL

Current Status: STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) hub in its first year of partnership with Johns Hopkins Talent **Development Secondary**

Long-Term Plan: Reinforce the entire Eastside Memorial vertical team

Eastside may be the poster child for the damaging effects of constant intervention and reconstitution. In the five and a half years since Johnston High was renamed Eastside Memorial High School at the Johnston Campus, it's been split into two schools (Global Tech and Green Tech), reintegrated, almost handed over to IDEA Public Schools to become an in-district charter, almost closed, and is now on its fifth principal. However, last year Texas Education Commissioner Michael Williams signed off on a deal that brought Johns Hopkins in as a consulting partner and professional development resource, and gave it three years to implement reform (see "Eastside and Johns Hopkins Get the TEA OK," June 5, 2013). AISD trustees received their scheduled quarterly update on the partnership on Jan. 12, and all metrics were at or above their targets. Board President Vince Torres said, "Things seem to be going well, the community seems to be happy and engaged, and we're concentrating on some of those things that are important for parents to help their kids." The big change from all the earlier reforms is that three year window after years of chop and change. "It lowers the stress level of people on the campus," Torres said, and allows families time to make lifestyle changes to help their kids. Education Austin President Ken Zarifis has praised the presence of Johns Hopkins - not just because of its results, which are already promising, but of how it was selected: through meaningful community outreach by AISD, "Taking that action was a step forward," he said, "and much closer to what we would like to see in how they engage the community ... in a much more robust and open way than they did in the past."



PEARCE AND GARCIA MIDDLE SCHOOLS

Current Status: Separate middle schools Long-Term Plan: Single-sex academies with a shared attendance zone, starting fall 2014

While voters were resoundingly rejecting plans for a boys' academy funded out of last year's bond proposals, AISD was quietly continuing with plans to convert two of its central East Austin campuses into single-sex academies. Girls in the area will head to the Young Women's Leadership Academy at Pearce, run by Principal Ivette Savina, and boys will attend the **Young Men's Leadership Academy** at Garcia under Principal Sterlin McGruder. Both campuses have had their share of troubles: Garcia, right on the eastern edge of AISD, has always struggled with

enrollment, while Pearce has been threatened with closure three times in the last five years. Now the district is developing a new educational model that will align them with the district's STEM plans. Controversially, the campus reconstitution plan includes developing "gender-specific instructional strategies." The idea that girls and boys learn differently has come under very serious attack, and may leave the district open to litigation (the ACLU in particular has been hot on filing civil rights suits on this issue). The district has also faced severe criticism from researchers, including at UT, who argue singlesex education has no benefits over coed classes, and may stunt social development (see "Uncontrolled Experiments," Dec. 9, 2011). There are also logistical concerns that come from merging the two schools into one super-sized attendance zone, meaning many

students will travel further to school. Then there are the families that won't want to send their kids to single-sex schools. AISD Board President Torres said that those students will be allowed to transfer to neighboring coed middle schools. Since so many of those are underenrolled, that shouldn't create an extra burden, he said: "Even if you say that 50 percent of the current students are interested in going somewhere else, and you look at the options of Burnet Middle School or Webb or Lamar, the impact wouldn't be significant." Before all of that, AISD faces the major task of educating parents and staff that the change is coming. Torres said, "As much as we like to assume that everyone in these communities knows what's going on. I can guarantee that the first day of school there will be someone who says, 'What, this is a single-sex school?" - R.W.

ALLAN ELEMENTARY

Current Status: Temporary home for library services; also configured as a reserve campus in case of emergency closures

Long-Term Plan: Under discussion

Another victim of planning turmoil, with community fury about both losing its neighborhood elementary to IDEA Public Schools, and then seeing it closed when IDEA's contract was terminated. To calm the waters, AISD has brought in local nonprofit Austin **Voices for Education and Youth** – the same group that ran the selection process to bring Johns Hopkins to Eastside - to lead the discussion on what to do with Allan. The first stage was to get community feedback on preferred programs, and on Jan. 27, trustees approved a second stage, with extra community meetings and the formation of an Ad Hoc Allan Facility Committee to "develop proposals and cost analysis that benefit the [Eastside Memorial vertical team] academically." With primary school age numbers too low to support an elementary, the most likely plans involve turning it back into a middle school (as it was originally designed to be) and housing either a dual language program or a STEM academy. Vincent Tovar, spokesman for Pride of the Eastside, said that a bilingual program would have to overcome the institutionalized idea that Spanishspeaking kids need to be moved to English as fast as possible, "White, affluent families are doing the research and seeing the benefits of bilingual education," he said, "but you've got East Austin administrators saying the opposite." However, board president Torres suggested that, since kids are likely to learn Spanish and English anyway, why not add a third language into the mix - Chinese. After all, there's historically been an international high school at Eastside, and Doss Elementary off Far West recently implemented a highly successful **Mandarin Chinese immersion** program. Torres said, "Can you imagine being a kid who can speak English, Spanish, and Chinese in the modern economy?"

TIMELINE OF KEY CHANGES

For decades, East Austin schools felt like they were being ignored by AISD and the Texas Education Agency. Then they felt barraged by a constant stream of intervention. The last decade has seen tumult, closures, repurposing, staff turnover, changes in leadership, and a general lack of the one thing that a campus needs to turn around – stability. Only time will tell whether the latest round of reforms are a cohesive push for real change, or just yet more dabbling that will be undone within a semester.

THE BEGINNINGS

1916 John T. Allan Junior High opens.1957 Allan Junior High moves to 4900 Gonzales St. after its previous campus was destroyed by fire.

1958 James E. Pearce Junior High opens.

1960 Albert S. Johnston High School opens to serve East Austin's primarily African-American and Hispanic population.

1980 Allan Junior High becomes Allan Elementary, reflecting shifting age demographics and demands in the area.

2007 AISD opens Gus Garcia Middle School to serve far East Austin.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

2007 Education Commissioner Robert Scott announces Johnston High will be closed due to low performance.

2008 Scott allows Johnston to be repurposed and it reopens as Eastside Memorial High School at the Johnston Campus.

2009 AISD trustees split Eastside into two schools: Green Tech and Global Tech.
After initially threatening to close Pearce,
Scott approves a repurposing plan that allows it to stay open.

2011 In January, the district's Facility Master Plan Task Force puts Pearce as an option on a list of campuses that could be closed to save costs – a plan they immediately dump after public outcry. In December, trustees split 6-3 to bring in IDEA Public Schools to open a public K-12 charter school, taking over Allan in 2012 and Eastside in 2013.

2011 AISD reunifies Eastside Green Tech and Global Tech.

2012 In September, Allan Elementary reopens as IDEA Allan. Three months later, AISD board cancels IDEA contract.

2013 After community outreach, AISD selects
Johns Hopkins Talent Development Secondary
as its external partner to reinforce achievements at Eastside. New commissioner Michael
Williams approves the partnership and gives
AISD three years to reach state standards.
IDEA moves out of Allan, which the district
semi-mothballs.

2014 Pearce and Garcia are scheduled to merge attendance zones for the new school year, when each campus will become a single-sex leadership academy.

2015 Earliest point at which Allan can reopen: The current consensus seems to be that it will become a middle school again, either STEM or dual language.











Today, 100 Years Ago

This issue of the Chronicle is dated Feb. 7, 2014. On Feb. 7, 1914, the world first beheld Charlie Chaplin on the screen in his iconic getup. That is fact. Slide over here into fiction, my novel-in-progress, The Dragon:

Three days before, on Feb. 4, 1914, a bemused sort of person entered "the Keystone," as Mack Sennett's lot was called. She was 16, barefoot, green-eyed, self-consciously flat-chested, and wore a raggedy dress. She called herself Willie; no last name. She'd lived all her life in that area, then called Edendale; her family's farm was a few steep hills away. Willie left school in the fourth grade for farm work. Like most folks in 1914, she's never turned on a faucet or an electric light, nor spoken into a telephone, nor ridden in a car, nor flushed a toilet. But she's sharp, uncommonly agile, kind of pretty, and game. Always carries a knife. And loves the "flickers." Befriended by some "Keystoners," she was invited to watch their newest offering:

On that screen was the Devil. I was raised to know the Devil. I'm looking at him, glad I got my knife. Small comfort, a knife against the Devil, but small is better than none. Amongst these folk, the Devil lives.

[Willie finds shelter that night in the prop shed.]

I swear, I smelt baking bread. Strong smell, too. From where, who knew? When we were little. Mother'd bake bread and we'd be hanging about for the smell, me and Fred, and Mother'd say, "You got any questions about Heaven, just remember the smell of baking bread and put that together with Forever. That's all you need to know about Heaven."

How's a person supposed to figure waking long before dawn with the Devil in my head amidst that smell of heavenly bread? And bells ringing. One's tinny, steady - a shepherd's staff, the bell hanging on twine from a hole drilled in the grip. There's a dog, too, well trained, yapping soft, suggestive-like, not a bark to wake folks up. And a happy-like clatter of harness bells, a onehorse rig, and the clip-clop of hooves that for no reason I can think of is the comforting'est sound, a horse steady at slow trot. And a streetcar's clang.

Clip-clop and tinkle'y harness got softer, farther, the streetcar closer, while the shepherd walked slow, each step making a

sweet double ring - his sheep must'a been a safe space from the tracks or he'd'a moved faster. I know that's a fine hardworking dog for that shepherd not to worry at that trolley.

No choice now but to follow my mind where it didn't want to go, but had to. 'cause a mind's got no control over itself, which, saith Daddy, "is how it is the Devil's instrument!"

I let go my will, tried to feel protection breathing that heavenly smell, and got to considering how, while folks laughed amidst tobacco scent, I seen the Devil on that screen. A skinny imp, walking quick and funny, waddlelike, and you see by the way he puffs his cigarette he's mean as spit.

Twirling a cane he was, tipping his bowler hat at this and that, pants and shoes some sizes too big, vest a size too small, the Devil don't need to care how he looks, no, he cares for nothin' but trouble and disruption, curlin' his lip under that little moustachio. The Devil, he can't take a stroll for the sake of a stroll but that he's gotta make someone unhappy.

It all began so normal. The crowd is real people. What's goin' on is real. You don't see that the Devil is the Devil right off. It's the walk that clues you first, you see he's strange, he don't walk like no one real. Then he looks at us. That ain't right, not for a flicker, not like that. He looks at us, interested, walks off, comes back, looks again, real interested. But it ain't us he's looking at, is it? It's the camera. He don't want that camera to crank at nothin' but him. He keeps goadin' that camera to crank at him, and the boss of the camera tries to fight him off, thinking he's dealing with just a man, but there's nothing just-aman about this imp, you can't fight him off, you can't get rid of him. The Devil struts and looks down his nose on

all the goin's on, 'cause he knows what's important here - and it's nothin' to him to slap a kid, he swings at one kinda hard - no, he knows what's important is that he's shown up, he's here, amongst us, and we'd better know it, and the camera is how we'll know. Oh, the Devil has discovered that camera! Where that ol' Devil comes from there ain't no cameras, it's like he's never heard of one - he ain't

God, after all, he doesn't know everything - but now he's seen one, it's gotta watch him or else. On that point he's all meanness. You can just see he's indestructible. Knock him down, he's up again. Throw him around, kick him, threaten, he ain't fazed. Try to reason with him, he listens all polite-like, tips his bowler at you, swings his cane like a toff, but that's just to make mockery, he's listening just to prove he won't listen. That boss is outmatched and finally knows it and allows for the Devil to look straight into that lens, claiming it as his own, and the meanness of his face is big on the screen scrunching itself up into more meanness and squinting those I-don't-care eyes right at me. Everybody laughed. Not me. I see what I see.

What I saw was a secret so terrible the Devil didn't have to keep it secret, 'cause it would be secret no matter what.

I'm not very smart. I don't know what the Devil's secret is, 'cept everybody's got a piece of it and everybody works real hard not to know it. Now that the Devil's found the flickers there's no tellin' what's comin'. And it's to Keystone that he came, same as me, breathing deep of Heaven.

[The next day, Willie hangs about the outdoor studio, where five film crews work simultaneously within a few feet of one another.]

So I'm mindin' my own beeswax midst the hammerin' and fiddlin' and shoutin' and thumpin' and crankin' and cussin', lookin' this way and that, trying not to be in the way, when the Devil caught my eye as I caught his.

I didn't flinch. That same small bowler's on his head, he holds the same cane, wears those big shoes, and his eyes are full'a mischief. I'm wishing I was Catholic, 'cause they can make the Sign of the Cross, but us Baptists, we got nothin' 'cept not flinchin'.

"What you lookin' at?" says I to the Devil. He burped, or pretended to, covered his mouth 'n' said, "Such odd things do pop out

Stuck my tongue out at him.

Stuck his back at me, tipped his bowler, then smiled like I never seen, for just a sec, then he's moony, he's silly, he's sad, and he laughs at all that, purely delighted with himself, lookin' sweet as any girl. Then his face is still. And every one'a those looks seemed dead real.

"You're the Devil. That's the Devil's way. He can be anything."

"Devil, is it? Nothing so grand. A minion, merely but eager to do my part."

Some guy calls out, "Chaplin!" "Pardon. I'm up." "Action!" a guy yells. A camera cranks and that ol' Devil tips his bowler to me and goes, but how he goes! Charges into a hallway, knocks a fellow down with a mighty slap and the Devil faces Walrus-Moustache and they butt chests

and the Devil rears back and kicks Walrus full in the chest with the flat of his big shoe, his leg straight out, I thought the man'd die, but Walrus sails through a doorway, Devil tries to sail after him but the door slams so hard in his face his head should'a come off, but he just pushes the door like nothin' happened and goes on in and that's that. Cranking stops.

'The Strange Undoing of Prudencia Hart'

THE SECOND TIME'S THE CHARM FOR THE NATIONAL THEATRE OF SCOTLAND'S DEVILISHLY CHARMING PLAY IN AUSTIN

Was it not a Scotsman who warned us. "The best laid schemes o' mice an' men,/Gang aft agley"?

No doubt the National Theatre of Scotland felt a little of the sting of Robbie Burns' phrase when the carefully laid plans that the company had made with Texas Performing Arts to share its The Strange Undoing of Prudencia Hart with Austin audiences a year ago had to be abandoned after just one performance. The show, which takes place in a pub with a quintet of musicians performing border ballads and unspooling the story of a buttoned-up academic who dances with the devil on a midwinter solstice night, creates the ambience of a pub, with a bar dispensing pints and wine and the audience seated at tables with bowls of beer nuts, and when possible, the company likes to perform it in a real bar. TPA had arranged for one for the show's weeklong run here, but on opening night, nonstop construction noise near the site interfered so badly with the performance that the run was aborted.

However, given the National Theatre of Scotland's successes here with its touring productions of Black Watch and Long Gone Lonesome, TPA Director Kathy Panoff was not about to give up on the show. Prudencia Hart was rebooked for the 2013-14 season, and to ensure that it would encounter no unexpected presentation issues, TPA is returning to the model it used for Long Gone Lonesome, which was also set in a bar, and creating the play's pub on the Bass Concert Hall stage. The five performers will weave among the tables as they transport us to Scotland on a frigid winter's night, placing us in the Kelso pub where poor Prudencia, trapped by a blizzard, finds the veils between our world and the underworld opening and the Devil leading his own ceilidh. Writer David Greig, composer Alasdair Macrae, and director Wils Wilson heard a tale very like it when they took a research trip to Kelso and ended up "locked in" at a pub by a raging snowstorm. An old man reportedly spun the tale of another group of people who'd come looking for songs and one of them, a woman, had never been seen again.

If the notion of spirited ballads and a spooky story to while away a winter evening strikes your fancy, you'd best buy your tickets now. Now that TPA and its Scottish friends have their act back together, you wouldn't want your best-laid schemes - Robert Faires going agley.

IN AN OLD REC ROOM, LEE WEBSTER STILL ANIMATES BY HAND

Lee Webster's studio is covered in wood paneling - that kind of Seventies wood paneling that can still be found easily in pier-andbeam homes on east Airport Boulevard and Manor Road (near where the artist's studio is located). "I feel I don't belong in a painterly studio," says Webster. "I belong in a romper room." A founding member of the (now defunct?) Austin Video Bee, Webster's practice swings between nonobjective abstraction and quirky takes on traditional landscapes. An example of the latter is the first in a series of videos in which Webster, a native of Philadelphia, sings Bruce Springsteen songs backwards atop an I-35 intersection. The geographies of Philadelphia, Austin, and New Jersey are cross-referenced and cross-pollinated - leaving the artist floating in a kind of generalized American landscape.

Lee Webster: It's kind of messy, but it's always kind of messy. I also feel like I'm a bit of a hoarder.

Austin Chronicle: Believe me, you're not even close! One of the things I was curious about in seeing your studio space is how do you begin

to figure out how your films and videos are going to "work" outside of this space? LW: One day I found a metal medical cart on

the side of the road - I pick up a lot of things from the side of the road! and it wound up being one of the best things I've picked up. It slides around, so it's perfect for figuring out projections and how big or small they need to be. I'll hang up a white sheet if I need to proximate a white wall.

AC: Because you work with some old technology [like] slide and film projectors, do you have a supplier for bulbs?

LW: Yeah, these projectors belong to [local visual artist] Lauren Klotzman, and we work in the same media sometimes. You can find the bulbs online and on eBay, but there are a couple of shops in town that sell them - those light bulb specialty stores. The first time I used projectors was while I was designing for theatre, and I've had bulbs go

out on me in that context, so I know what to do. AC: You use 16mm? LW: Yes, you can still buy film from Kodak. I do a lot of direct animation - drawing directly onto

film - but Kodak doesn't sell the film leader anymore. There's a supplier from Canada I order from for that. I've also been making small light boxes from the animated leader. Sometimes I use bits of light gels to make these direct animations by collaging directly onto the leader. Most of my work is more experimental and narrative-based. I

came back to direct animation after having not done it for a long time. It's a counter to my narrative work - much more about form, movement, color,

AC: What's a typical work week in the studio like? LW: I usually don't get in the studio for full days, I try to get in for three to four days for a few hours a day.


and abstraction.

AC: Doing the kind of film animation you do can be incredibly time-con-

suming, so for a small roll of leader about how many hours of work would you guesstimate goes into that?

LW: Oh, gosh! I don't know - probably 100 hours! Sometimes if I paint on film, I can cover 300 feet of film very quickly, but when I'm doing the more detail-oriented stuff it takes awhile.

Common Purpose

Insights from Common House arts space

Just down 49th Street from Airport Boulevard sits a very uncommon house. Full-time studio, part-time gallery, and temporary home for numerous visiting artists over the past three years, this humble bungalow has provided Austin with a continuous stream of contemporary art peppered with unorthodox exhibitions and events. It is a home of risk-takers. Studio holders Rich Cali, William Gaynor, Conner O'leary, and Autumn Spadaro started the arts locale, along with Adam Mendez, who has since

moved on to a career in design out of state. Gaynor recalls being introduced to Spadaro and Cali by mutual friend O'leary on the front porch to sign the lease - a leap of faith that set the tone for the next many months. Risks taken have given this building and community, branded Common House, an appearance and vibe that

may not be as refined as the usual gallery or studio. However, what Common House lacks in refinement, it makes up for in deeper considerations, drive, and unabashed grit.

Exhibitions here are usually chosen with an eye for high-level craftsmanship and a good dose of irreverence. They have a propensity for matte finishes, dry woods, and sun-bleached color which, along with the aforementioned traits, somehow embody Austin's rural/urban split personality. In addition to multiple discrete works, each show includes some element of installation. That has taken many forms: oversized stenciled silhouettes that flatten three-dimensional space, crossing every plane of the gallery to hide behind framed works ("We Used to Walk," Colin Holloway and Michael W. Hall); floor-to-ceiling diagrams, grouping paintings together to form a cryptic single piece greater than its parts ("Phantasms of the Living," Heather Gabel); timber-lined tunnels, weaving through the house and spilling visitors into the backyard ("You Can't Get There From Here," group show); and a full room conversion from studio space to culture-blending hon-

> ky-tonk pseudo-shrine, lit in equal parts by candlelight and neon signs ("Cowboys & Indians & Indians," William Gaynor). There's a strong inclination toward immersive experience. The exhibitions are fun and thoughtful - cerebral without being pedantic. At times, though, the irreverence gets the best of the group with some works and shows that break up the space or seem geared to make outsiders squirm, "A Touch of Class" by arts collective Public School is the most shining example, with its large wall exactingly painted with a large graphic of an anthropomorphized pile of poo vomiting up green bile, and its large text cut from construction paper reading simply "BALLS."

This deliberate irreverence even extends to the archive in which images of previous shows alternate with photos of what seem like chemical-induced reveries or folks flipping the bird at everything: people, money, the camera, inanimate objects. But even in these peculiar calling cards, something feels calculated, as if their makers are saying: "Yes, we are artists. Yes, we put on stunning shows. Yes, we've built a unique community. No, we couldn't care less if you think we're esteemed professionals."

Taking a Chance

"There have been some failures along the way. Some overly ambitious ideas." says O'leary. There's the large-group collaborative indoor mural which was reevaluated and abandoned before completion or, most memorably, the Dead Tree Monument. After a beloved lifeless tree had been removed from the yard without warning by the landlords, the four decided to erect a memorial in its stead. They cemented a few two-by-fours in its place and attached various ephemera from the studios. A toy train was tacked on at some point. By the light of day, the monument "just looked like tweaker art" and a great deal of time was spent uprooting the eyesore from the yard. The studio holders can offer countless other anecdotes along the same lines.

This willingness to experiment and fail, and the camaraderie necessary to move on without a second thought, are the real driving forces behind Common House. The group's bold lineup of exhibitions has test-

ed and occasionally broken the unspoken boundaries of contemporary art. They work with those on the fringes: designers, street artists, furniture makers, illustrators, and others sidelined by purely academic thrusts. From an outside perspective, some of these choices may seem to have been made naively, but after speaking with the Common House founders, it's clear that their decisions come from a place of deep consideration and grounded perspective. These folks know exactly what they are doing.

Many contemporary art aficionados may have eyed the recent exhibition "Rock of Ages" with skepticism. Hosting work by tattoo artists - timed for the Star of Texas Tattoo Art Revival - is a step away from the usual role of contemporary art spaces.

"We were hesitant at first," Gaynor says, "We didn't just want it to be a bunch of traditional flash, but these guys were all artists before they ever put ink to skin. In conversation, they'll bring up anything from the surrealists to postmodernism, and most folks don't expect it from a guy with tattoos all over his head."

"We wanted to make this about work that they normally don't have an outlet for," adds Spadaro.

From Cali: "The tattoo artists would come into the space after spending all day at the festival, sit down, pick up a brush, and paint the rest of the night. They've got serious dedication, and we're happy to give them a space to work while they're here. It's not all that unusual. We've had exhibiting artists come in a few days before an opening, work all day in the space, sleep in the gallery, wake up, work all day again, sleep in the gallery, work some more, sweep up, and open that night totally exhausted. Then the next day, they're back again working on something else."

Common House is drawn to the tireless, dedicated artist. It seeks these individuals out and offers a framework. With little to no guidance, the artist is given space to create, an exhibition to work toward, a team that will promote them, and free rein over the outcome. Common House focuses the energy of those whose energy seems boundless. Working from the idea that arts locales have a responsibility to stitch together disparate elements of the scene, the studio holders choose these individuals without regard to media, age, or affluence, but solely on the

quality of and dedication to their art.

Filling a Role

When talk turns to what the city scene is, what it boasts and what it lacks, these artists make clear that they believe Austin lays claim to a wealth of talent, citing MASS Gallery and zine publisher Crummy House by name. Asked why Austin's art scene hasn't found the footing that, say, Houston's

has, they pause thoughtfully before offering surprisingly insightful answers. Instead of the usual "there's more money in Houston," which they address and dismiss, Gaynor says boldly: "There's no reason why Austin shouldn't be the Southwest arts hub connecting New York and L.A."

It's a very optimistic assertion. Yet with Austin being the fastest growing city in the country, with its relatively strong economy, increasing influx of corporate capital, and vast and talented population of artists, why isn't it meeting its visual arts potential?


"I think there's a stubborn generational gap," offers Spadaro. "With few exceptions, we get the 20-40 crowd at our shows, and it seems to be the same elsewhere. We've got a lot of support. Some of our viewers buy work almost every month, but there does seem to be a price point in Austin where nontraditional art stops selling. It may be the expendable income of the younger generation hasn't swelled to the point of being able to support artists in a bigger way."

Cali adds, "Our role in the whole thing, after keeping our own practices going, is to keep showing work, keep things fresh, and maintain the sense of community. I don't think we've ever really turned a profit. All the money goes right back into the space."

Common House is fearless. Faced with criticism that can keep some artists within certain parameters or assertions that some associations will diminish one's clout or tarnish one's "contemporariness," they keep forging onward, maintaining their mission to the communities they serve.

Like many galleries in Austin that don't turn a profit, they deserve to. One hopes that when Austin residents catch up to those in Houston, or even San Antonio, in their purchasing power for bold, local contemporary art, Common House will be among the first spaces to feel the benefit.

It's these attitudes, this grit, its DIY mentality, and a sense of purpose beyond profit that lift up Common House and like-minded art spaces. The founders' youth belies their insightfulness into Austin's art scene and its broader context. The space remains fertile ground for experimental work. Like its founders, Common House doesn't fit into any easy mold. It's part publishing house, part exhibition space, part studio, part arts advocacy group, part community center. It's far from polished, a bit fast and loose, but it might be just what Austin needs more of.



Tosca

Dell Hall at the Long Center, 701 W. Riverside Feb. 1

So mighty were the forces at war in Austin Lyric Opera's recent production of Tosca that heaven and hell themselves seemed to be tussling over the fate of the titular singer. From the first notes – which erupted from the pit like a volcanic blast from the underworld - we were thrust into a world of high drama, every scene heightened to an intensity beyond the natural.

Of course, much of the credit for that (or blame, if you consider the opera a "shabby little shocker," as it was once famously dismissed) belongs to Giacomo Puccini, who

drenched this melodrama of political intrigue, romantic rivalry, betrayal, and violence in music of monumental passion and staggering turmoil. Still, it takes an artistic team of considerable skill to bring all the power in the score to bear onstage, and ALO assembled one that invested Tosca's love of an artist and pursuit by the sinister chief of the Roman police with a kind of cosmic import. When Scott Piper, as the artist Cavaradossi, declared his devotion to his raven-haired diva, his pure tenor rocketed upward till it scraped the clouds; all he lacked to be a celestial messenger was the wings. As his opposite, the lustful and cruel Scarpia, Wayne Tigges would drop his voice into the lower register

like he was bringing down a cudgel on a dissident's skull; though at times he gave in to the temptation to play the villain with a capital V - sadistic laugh and all - Tigges' delivery of the line "Tosca, you make me forget God," was chilling. With the chorus behind him booming the "Te Deum" - kudos to chorus master Marc Erck for drawing forth such an epic sound - it brought the first act to a spectacular close.

As for the woman caught between these paragons of good and evil, she wore her piety as casually as a shawl - at least at first. In Tosca's early scenes, soprano Mardi Byers played up the diva - in the contemporary sense of the word - letting the character's suspicion and coquettishness dominate, so there wasn't much evidence of the truly devout in her or even of much true love for Cavaradossi, save in the beauty of her singing. But as the opera progressed, Byers' Tosca deepened in feeling, and when she reached the aria "Vissi d'arte," asking the Lord why he has "rewarded" her, a faithful servant, with such torment, she projected a genuine air of confusion and abandonment. From that point on, it was clear where her lovalties lav.

Maestro Richard Buckley, however, despite working from a spot down below, was always on the side of the angels. The robustness of the orchestral sound, its richness in communicating drama and character - not only in the heavily weighted sections of the score but also in the lighter passages, which the musicians handled with a notable delicacy and lyricism - revealed just how far Buckley has taken this orchestra in 10 years. It may be fallacious to say the ALO orchestra has never sounded better, but it was certainly as responsible for drawing me into this epic drama and propelling me through it as the singers. And in this cosmic conflict, it sounded heavenly. - Robert Faires

'Girls Gone West' **UT Visual Arts Center. 2300 Trinity** www.utvac.org Through March 8

Student or not, one of the most interesting spaces to view artwork in Austin is the Center Space of the University of Texas' Visual Arts Center. Curated by the VAC's student organization, the FUBU rule - for us, by us - is in deep play here, and the results are a crapshoot. You'll either encounter work that's lackluster and undergraduate-y, or you'll feel like you're bearing witness to the first in a long, robust career of exhibitions.

Happily, the latest Center Space entry, "Girls Gone West," is well within the latter category. "GGW," in title and premise, takes the conceit of what is now an annual rite of passage, the undergraduate spring break trip (the horror), and turns it inside out. Instead of James Franco whispering, "Spring break foreeeeevarrr," we get quirky, think-y, and often hilariously deadpan riffs on a spate of Seventies earthworks scattered across the American West. Artists like Robert Smithson, Nancy Holt, Walter de Maria, and Michael Heizer made monumental interventions into the land in remote, hard-to-find locales, partially as an escape from the overdetermined space of the white-cube gallery. Each of the five young artists of "GGW" - Karina Eckmeier, Allie Underwood, Maia Schall, Ally Acheson-Snow, and Chantal Wnuk - has her own approach to the Rubik's Cube of making artwork about other artwork, yet all of the work in this exhibition feels forged from the same crucible. Lesser artists would be decimated, so this is no small task.



The classic American road trip – a kind of mythic journey and rite of passage of another era - informs a great deal of the work here. Wnuk's tiny, quietist work is a sustained meditation on the materials of the landscape (the constant use of red thread is practically Kabbalistic), while Eckmeier's task-based performance videos honor the seriousness and loopiness of these latter-day pilgrimage sites. In one video performance, entitled Tunnel Pull-Up, Eckmeier stands atop a small igloo cooler, grasping the large round holes of one of Nancy Holt's iconic Sun Tunnels (1976); performing the titular pull-up, Eckmeier's dress gets blown about by the wind. Like the wind whipping up, the performance shifts its intention, and thus its meanings, drastically. It's a sucker-punch of a video.

Of course, Schall, Acheson-Snow, and Underwood each produce stunning work as well, by turns formally compelling and historically playful. But you'll just have to make the trip to see it. - Andy Campbell

The Bowie Project: A Rock & Roll Soundpainting Stateside at the Paramount, 719 Congress Jan. 31

A body of work. We all have one, in those periods, focuses, facets that surface at different times during our lives, but for few of us are these surfacings as crystallized, as deeply etched for the public to

make of them what they will, as they are for lifelong pop stars like David Bowie, When Andrea Ariel Dance Theatre, in collaboration with the Bowie tribute band the Super Creeps and Strike Anywhere Performance Ensemble, dove into Bowie's work and life to-date, the glittering takeaway was how marvelously one person's body of work can inspire a cultural mood that, in iterations beyond the artist's conceit or control, becomes a force in the experiences of others.

Because though actor Nolan Kennedy's tired, strung-out Bowie was no more a complete Bowie than the Super Creeps' frontman,


Adam Sultan, each was a representation of a facet of the Bowie epic. (Some fans may have found it a shortcoming, though, that 21st century Bowie was largely missing.) In using soundpainting (the multigenre improvisation technique in which conductors use baseball signal-like gestures to elicit actions by the group) to mix, splice, and warp Bowie's music, narrative bits culled from Bowie's interviews, and dance, AADT Artistic Director Andrea Ariel and her collaborators wove together the texts of individual experiences of Bowie's work, and of Bowie's own work with itself and himself.

As these experiences intermingled, it became clear how Bowie's devotion to invented personae – Ziggy Stardust, the Thin White Duke – is akin to the Super Creeps' devotion to Bowie (the tribute-band genre itself

cultivating multiple layers of personae). Though the show's narrative reminded us that Bowie's characters may have been a strategy to appease the mental illness that plagued his family, the show found richness, rather than schizophrenia, in dual experiences and different strata of meaning. At the end of the ballad "Space Oddity," as Major Tom floated off into space, Kennedy riffed on isolation and loneliness while the dancer Alyson Dolan, moving forward in space with a big bent-leg rond de jambe, her body reeling backward, embodied the other facet of the song, the tragic-romantic one in which all of space is the iceberg and Tom's abandoned capsule is the ship.



True. Bowie seems to have gone to the edge of the universe and back, more than once and all at once. Ariel has been making dances in Austin a long time - I've barely scratched the surface of her body of work - and there's value in this collaborative perspective on the Bowie epic: It's reassurance that all we are expected to do in life is just keep on making the songs we need to make. - Jonelle Seitz

THE ARTS STYLE

Of Pomp and Pompadours

Street style maven Shelley Neuman sparkles in blue and black. Erin Freeman styles a floaty

A girl's first fashion show is an important affair, especially when said "girl" is a style columnist in her early-mid-cough-cough 30s. Saturday's launch of Austin-based slow-fashion brand Essential Oliver had all the ingredients for a season three Gossip Girl B-plot: a warehouse location filled with dangerous equipment, a live DJ, and beautiful people wearing defiant jewelry.

"I worry that this town is becoming a bunch of single file line events," said the guy with a

skateboard who stood behind me as we waited, single file, to get into the Delta Millworks lumber factory. "You know what I mean?"

"Actually, no," I said.

"What do you mean?" But before I could hear the explanation, we were rescued from our single file fate by a line attendant checking for RSVPs. Sir Skateboard and I parted ways as I discovered my VIP status and donned my badge, a leather tab riveted to a scrap of dyed organic cotton. Channeling Tony Curtis in Sweet Smell of Success, I squared my jaw, glowered, and spat, "From now on, the best of everything is good enough for me!" Then I went to stand in another single file line at the Republic Tequila table. I'm not sure if it was the VIP line or the IP line or just the P line, but an

open bar is an open bar. I was about to discover one of the fundamentals of shooting a fashion show. It turns out the key word is "shooting" - shots, not mixed drinks. My first attempt to take a picture while sipping from a plastic cup resulted in an artful wet splotch down the front of my blouse. Guess I should have been on "aperture priority" mode! That's a little DSLR humor for you, folks.

So from that point on, I took my liquid refreshment from a disposable pill cup. Hands now free and courage sufficiently tequilaed, I approached a towering redhead wearing sequined shorts and a glittering kimono jacket over a mesh-paneled bodysuit, who turned out to be fashion photographer Shelley Neuman of the website ATX Street Style. Nearby were Erin Freeman, a betty-banged brunette in a printed mini-muu; and Jillian Newman, who wore an Eighties peplum jacket in an African wax print over a studded bustier.

When I asked Newman that most thirtysomething of questions, "What do you do?" she replied that she was part of "Austin's young going-out scene." "That's A-Y-G-O-S," she spelled out. Now, I'm pretty sure she was kidding. Even I know that Aygos are tiny little Toyota automobiles available only in Europe. But just to be safe, I'm including it, because "PYT" is so Year of the Snake.

Other stylish standouts included Adrienne Avbar, who paired a houndstooth-faced blazer

> in blueberry with a statement belt and amulet, and graphic designer Nicole Labry, who nabbed her gleaming breastplate at Spring Frost.

After an hour or so of schmooze, the lights dimmed, the music pumped louder, and all the AYGOS and I got to see what Essential Oliver is all about. The brand's website calls it "artisan apparel for the everyday craftsperson" and "vintage work wear with a surf vibe." Designer Tasha Petty has said that her brand was inspired by a road trip that had her pondering the history of work in America.

In practice, this meant pompadoured women strolling down the runway in

mechanics' jumpsuits, some chopped at the knee, while men sported cabana-boy button-downs faced in tropical fabrics. The T-shirts, which form the spine of the collection, looked both soft and sufficiently complex, some marled with sherbet-y colors like an overexposed photograph.

Accessories, shoes, and jeans were provided by high-concept local artisanal brands like Paleo Denim and Satchel & Page. Such is the design aesthetic of the lumber mill, though there was something a bit odd about the contrast between the hard-tippling, high-heeled partygoers and the blue-collar designs on the runway. Essential Oliver may not be essential in the strictest sense of the word, but it will serve Austin's eco-conscious, locavore styletariat well, with clothes that might even improve with a grease stain or two.

And that VIP badge, incidentally, makes a spiffing key fob.



Plight in Flight CAN AUSTIN SAVE THE MIGRATORY MONARCH BY PLANTING PIT-STOP SNACKS?

Talk of food deserts and kinks in the food chain rarely include mention of the state insect of Texas. Yet the rapidly declining population of migratory monarch butterflies, iconic symbols of transformation, demonstrates the fragility of the global agricultural and food systems. Second only to the similarly beleaguered bees (whose ongoing crisis is championed by the likes of Austin's own

Walter Schumacher), butterflies are one of nature's great pollinators. These insects are credited with pollinating 75% of food crops, and for an efficient, sustainable system, biodiversity is essential. It's simple, really: If bugs go kaput, human food goes, too.

A multifaceted issue, the ethereal creature's tale is one full of science and strategy. Research largely places the blame for monarch (*Danaus plexippus*) disappearance on the twin shoulders of the agricultural system and problems wrought by climate change. Drought, loss of natural habitat and vegetation via urban development, and GMO-laden monoculture (specifically corn and soy) in commercial farming all contribute to the problem. Also fueling the fire are the devastating effects of neonicotinoid pesticides, a ban on which has been circulating in United States legislation for years to no avail. (The European Union banned neonicotinoids in 2013.) By starving the butterflies' primary food sources and breeding grounds – milkweeds (*Asclepias*), also known as butterfly weed – and drastically reducing the insects' immunities to disease, it's no wonder the insects are struggling.

The declining stability of monarchs is evidenced by a significant decrease in numbers: The population of migratory monarchs arriving in Mexico is estimated around 450 million in typical years past, but reports indicate only 60 million survived the 2012 trek, and a measly 3 million monarchs crossed the finish line in 2013. In fact, *The New York Times* reported in November that, for the first time in memory, monarch butterflies did not arrive in Mexico in time for the Day of the Dead celebration. If only the butterfly saga were folklore.

Austin is located directly on the monarch's annual flight path, and Lone Star Nursery, one of a handful of 100% certified organic nurseries in the area, sees the opportunity for Central Texans to aid the butterflies. The East Austin nursery, which specializes in useful and rare plants, is spearheading a "Bring Back the Monarch" campaign to encourage people to plant more milkweed. Owners Jay and Flint Beard are teaming up with Carla Jenkins of Texas Farmers Market to educate the public on the crucial need for butterfly assistance. Their pesticide-free native milkweed seedlings will be available at select farmers' markets (including Cedar Park, Mueller, Barton Creek Farmers Market, and SFC Downtown Farmers Market), as well as Lone Star's various retail outlets and "any and all interested community gardens around town," by early March when the chances of a freeze have passed. The proliferation of milkweed should help, says Jay: "Planting front yards, backyards, neighbors" yards, school yards, roadsides, and medians will definitely give [the butterflies] the snack they need to continue [their journey]."

By planting a variety of these perennial multipurpose plants this spring, the butterfly weeds will flourish during the coming fall and next spring, a near-guarantee for boosting the beautiful butterfly kaleidoscope, thereby strengthening the entire food system.

Well, here we are with another flurry of restaurant openings, reopenings, and adjustments. As always, bear in mind that opening dates are a moving target due to the city of Austin's permit process. After a couple of weeks of serving hotel guests, and a well-attended media party, Shawn Cirkiel's new Chavez (111 E. Cesar Chavez) at the Radisson opened to the public on Monday. The new space is striking, with floor-toceiling windows overlooking Lady Bird Lake, and an inviting menu of Southwestern, Mexican, and Texas flavors... Speaking of local hotel restaurants, word is the Driskill Grill will emerge from a few weeks of closure while the kitchen was getting some "enhancements" and should be open this week with executive chef and master sommelier Troy Knapp at the helm.

Also coming Downtown is the first Texas outlet of the Minneapolis fine dining chain **Crave** (340 E. Second). The American cuisine and sushi restaurant has taken over the long-shuttered Roy's Hawaiian space near the Convention Center and opens to the public on Feb. 10... **Sap Apisaksiri** expects the second location of **Sap's Fine Thai Cuisine** (5800 Burnet Rd.) to be debut on Friday, Feb. 7... **Titaya's** legion of devoted fans finally had their hope and patience rewarded when the newly remodeled eatery reopened earlier this week.

The Hightower (1209 E. Seventh) opened quietly a couple of weeks back and partners Chad Dolezal and Victor Farnsworth, formerly of El Arbol, are serving dinner Tuesdays through Sundays and have added a happy hour from 5-7pm... While driving on the Eastside over the weekend, I spied a new sign at The Silo on Seventh (1300 E. Seventh) as well as a notice in the window that hiring has begun. I am anxious to see what been done to the revitalize the old Tony's Tortilla Factory and to check out the view from the Silo's rooftop patio.

Continuing east, we noticed some final touches being added to the new home of **LaV** (1501 E. Seventh), which we hope means they'll hit their projected mid-February opening date... After an opening month of packed-house, 300-covers-pernight business, **Odd Duck** (1201 S. Lamar) now offers lunch service Monday through Friday, from 11:30am-2pm. Owner **Bryce Gilmore** says he still plans to add brunch and late night service at some point in the future, but he'd first like to get his staff accustomed to the added volume of lunch service before taking on anything else.

When money for local real estate development began to flow again, it was bound to have an impact on the proliferation of local food trailer courts that had popped up on vacant lots around the central city. Now that some of those properties are back in development play, food truck operators have been shuffling and relocating, trying to find the best spots for both parking accessibility and foot traffic. The newest spot on the horizon is **The Picnic food trailer court** (1720 Barton Springs Rd.) on the tree-shaded site of the former Mobile Manor RV trailer park. Look for eight vendors to be set up in the court when it opens in March.



From Russia, With Love

More than 20 years after the Soviet Union fell, Austin finally experiences some culinary glasnost

The first thing one sees upon walking into Russian House is the giant taxidermied black bear guarding a costume closet filled with military greatcoats and fur hats. These entry-level signifiers of Russia should be easily recognizable to any American born before 1990. But advance a bit more deeply into the restaurant and guests will encounter both the uncanny and the alien, artifacts of a culture that for many Americans remains mysterious and eminently foreign. What shouldn't be foreign, though, is the food.

Russian food in Austin is a rare find, and Austin businesses trading in eastern European culinary products have not fared well over the long term. The European Bistro in Pflugerville, which enjoyed a decade-long tenure serving everything from Hungarian paprikash to beef stroganoff, shuttered in 2012. Sasha's Gourmet Russian Market in Allandale, which offered eastern European groceries as well as takeaway borscht and blinis, lasted a mere six years, closing its doors in the spring of 2013. As such, Austinites are not well-versed in Russian food, much to Varda Salkey's bemusement.

"The first response is very interesting," explains Salkey, who owns and operates Russian House with her chef husband Vladimir Gribkov, "[People sav] 'Oh, I'm so scared! It's so scary, I don't know what to order!' The food is very similar, Russians eat the same thing, the same beef, same chicken, the same product, just cooked a little bit differently."

"There are very few things that you could distinctly say are Russian food," says Dr. Mary Neuburger, director of the Center for Russian, East European, and Eurasian Studies (CREEES) at UT-Austin. "But when you go to Russia, there are certain things that they eat a lot of, [such as] smoked and cured fishes, a lot of meat, black bread, borscht, a lot of pickled vegetables. A lot of beets and cabbage-based things. In the summer they frantically harvest and then they make all these different pickles to eat during the long winters."

Because Russia itself is an enormous country with diverse geographic features, the menu at Russian House is necessarily huge. It's helpful to think of the regions represented on the menu in two parcels: the East European Plain, comprising the Baltic states and what's considered "European Russia"; and the West Siberian Plain, which includes the arctic tundra to the north and east (Siberia) and dry steppes to the south (where Russia borders Mongolia and Kazakhstan). "We tried to narrow it down as much as possible to the most traditional or famous dishes," says Salkey. "That's why we have a buffet at brunch on Sunday, so [Vladimir] doesn't have to stick to the menu and he can introduce people to other, new things."

Foods on the extensive Russian House menu that represent the East European Plain include Ukrainian borshch, a beetbased hot soup studded with chunks of beef and potato and garnished with parsley and a dollop of sour cream. Paired with a pirozhok (a bun filled with meat), it's the typical Muscovite's lunch, according to Ashley Squires, a recently minted Ph.D. from UT who now works as the associate director of the Writing and Communications Center at the New Economic School in Moscow. "You will find borsch on just about every restaurant menu in Moscow, even if that restaurant specializes in, say, French food," she writes via email. Eaten in the main dining room at Russian House, which is outfitted with homey furniture and knickknacks imported from Russia that are eerily familiar - apparently, granny chic transcends cultural boundaries - these dishes rapidly narrow the gap between scary and recognizable.

Representing the West Siberian Plain on the Russian House menu are pelmeni, meat-filled dumplings reminiscent of Chinese dumplings or even tortellini. Served with a plate of sour cream and other sauces for dipping, they are generally believed to have originated in Siberia as an effective way to preserve meat for the winter. The foods of Uzbekistan, best represented in the form of Uzbek plov (pilaf). serve as the bridge from Europe

to Asia; diners can enjoy dishes like these in the private Uzbek dining room at Russian House, the walls of which are lined with

tapestry rugs and traditional Uzbek clothing.

Representing the Caucasus region, where the Winter Olympics will be held in Sochi this year, is shashlik, meat and fish kebabs that clearly bear the influence of that region's proximity to the Middle East, particularly Turkey. According to Squires, shashlik is ubiquitous in Russia because "Georgian food is to Moscow what Mexican food is to Austin or San Antonio. It's been heavily incorporated into the traditional foodways, but still remains its own thing."

Much like America, Russia is a melting pot, a mishmash of cultures brought together via geopolitical upheavals and globalization, a slice of which Austinites can encounter at Russian House, whether it's over a meal or at one of their dozens of celebrations of Russian holidays or at the free Russian-language classes every Wednesday at 5pm. "I take pride in representing our country here. I want people to come here and feel a little bit of Russia," says Salkey. "Maybe they've never been to Russia before, maybe they'll never even go. But I want them to taste what Russia is, to feel welcome, to meet Russians, and get as much exposure as possible."

Exposure to Russia is not something many Americans have in abundance. For generations of Americans, Russians were the bad guys in our cultural imagination, bent on stealing our state secrets or parachuting into the mountains of Colorado and murdering strapping high school boys. Like other European countries during the 18th and 19th centuries, Russia struggled to balance the whims of the aristocracy with the energy of the proletariat. In 1917, the Russian revolution led to the dissolution of the tsarist regime, which controlled all of the country's wealth via a feudal hierarchy. When the Bolsheviks, led by Vladimir Lenin, took control of the government in the October Revolution of 1917, they set the wheels in motion for the creation in 1922 of the Soviet Union, a Communist state that incorporated Russia and various Eastern European republics, including Uzbekistan, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Armenia, and Ukraine.

The Communist party, led by Lenin and then Joseph Stalin, replaced the autocracy with a much more restrictive state-controlled economy. While this centralization of the union's wealth made it an international economic powerhouse, the repression of the citizenry required to execute such a plan had calamitous effects both on Russian culture and agriculture. The elite fled the country, while peasants and farmers were forced to turn their land over to the state -

> they were murdered if they resisted. Famines ensued, along with perpetual shortages of basic supplies.

After World War II, during which time the USSR fought alongside the Allies, Stalin led the Union in a reconstruction effort that consolidated Communist control of the Eastern Bloc, leading to increased tension with the West, rooted specifically in clashing ideologies of democracy and economic systems. Lasting from around 1947 to 1991, the Cold War severely

limited the exchange of ideas and cultural practices between the United States and the USSR. The indelible images of Soviet bread lines served as Western politicians' proof that Communism was a failed experiment. Without any other information, Americans can extrapolate from there: How can you have a food culture when you have no food?

"The Cold War did keep Americans from going there and discovering Russian food;



when they did go, it was during a time when there wasn't much happening in Russian cuisine," says Neuburger, who recommends Anya von Bremzen's 2013 memoir, Mastering the Art of Soviet Cooking, to those who are interested in learning more about Russian foodways. "Not that many Russians were getting out during that period, and the ones that did were Jewish and had their own particular cuisine, but that immigration was limited in terms of geographic reach. It's worth discovering for Americans."

In addition to taking advantage of the cultural education Russian House has to offer, Austinites interested in learning more about Russian food and culture can do so at Food for Thought: Culture and Cuisine in Russia and Eastern Europe, a symposium on the UT campus hosted by CREEES Feb. 7-8. More than three dozen scholars will present papers on Russia's cultural attitudes toward food, primarily through the lens of literature, film, comic books, and food blogs. The keynote speaker, Dr. Ronald LeBlanc, will discuss Russian food practices from Tolstoy's religious-inspired vegetarianism to the Soviet "hamburgers" (kotleti) popularized by Stalin's food supply official, Anastas Mikoyan. Other presentations will investigate celebrity chefs, post-Communist domestic practices, and viticulture.

Naturally, the festivities culminate in a dinner at Russian House, where attendees can party amid decorative matroyshkas of former Communist leaders and pose, clad in military coats and fur hats, with that giant bear on the threshold, knowing that the signifiers are mere props and that the real proof of culture is in the pelmeni.



Harmonic Convergence

Cheerfully and unabashedly anachronistic, Austin Land & Cattle Company boasts no foams or fermented potatoes or dehydrated marshmallow powders. Instead, there is classic steak house fare: rib eye, sirloin, filet mignon, New York strip. Yes, there are potatoes - mashed and two cuts of fries. There is shrimp cocktail, escargot, and fried mushrooms. This is deeply American cuisine: simple, elegant, and for the most part, expertly prepared. Which is why, after two decades, ALC enjoys a well-earned reputation as the go-to steak house in the city.

In reality, though, there are two ALCs, and each tells the story of how a traditional steak house manages to stay relevant in an ever-changing culinary landscape under the leadership of owners Christian and Theresa Mertens.

For those seeking a destination spot for birthdays, anniversaries, or just a comfortable, upscale family meal, the main restaurant is the best bet. On Sunday night, diners can opt for a three-course, prix fixe menu (\$35), for which a portion of the proceeds go to various local charities. This is a very good value consisting of a starter, a protein with one accompaniment, and a dessert. We chose this option for our hungry son, selecting a Caesar salad and a sirloin

steak, but the biggest hit on his dinner plate were the mashed potatoes, which he inhaled in a blink, then asked for seconds. He did not care for the fudge brownie pie that completed his dinner; it was indeed too gelatinous to be considered a brown-

ie, and the chocolate flavor lacked depth.

Although there are options beyond beef on the menu, we stuck with the restaurant's titular protein. My 10-ounce rib eye (\$32) was tender, simply seasoned with salt and pepper, and virtually flawless. Paired with a loaded baked potato, it was a hearty yet elegant meal. And while I am of the opinion that a good steak doesn't need a sauce, we were curious about what ALC had to offer. My husband ordered the house-made chimichurri sauce (\$2) to go with his 10-ounce sirloin (\$28), and it was herbaceous and delicious. On another visit, we got the ALC homemade sauce (\$2), and it was umamirich with a bit of a kick to finish.

We rounded out our meal with a shared crème brûlée (\$6.50), which was a mild disappointment: The brûléed caramelized layer was too thick, resulting in a crunchy sugar glass that overpowered the delicate custard underneath. My parents' tiramisu (\$7) had a nice balance of flavors and wasn't soggy, which is so often the bane of the layered dessert.

The dining room is an homage to high-end folk art and Western memorabilia, which is to be expected in a steak restaurant in Texas. On the other hand, the bar area, its walls adorned with guitars and other musical memorabilia, is a more relaxed, Austin-appropriate space, ideal for happy hours, casual dates, or an early stop on a night out with friends.

On a Saturday night, we enjoyed a solid hour of people-watching in the bar, witnessing parties of black-tie-clad patrons enter followed closely by parties in T-shirts and jeans. Our table was situated between a welldressed, foul-mouthed man who knew nearly every visitor who passed by and a family of five whose children were well-mannered and very excited about their burgers. Rightly so, as the ALC Burger (\$9) is one of the best hamburgers I have ever had - rich, juicy, and simply seasoned. The bar menu is also a great way to experience a variety of the steaks on offer at ALC in the form of the steak sampler (\$11), two-ounce cuts each of velvety filet mignon, rib eve, and sirloin. We split a slice of

> the house-made ALC vanilla cheesecake (\$7), which was magnificent - tender, not too sweet, and of the perfect consistency. Simply put, in the bar, we had fun while also enjoying an excellent, casual meal.

> With the addition of a catering truck that makes

appearances at events like Fun Fun Fun Fest and SXSW, and what appears to be an incremental rebranding effort, moving from "Austin Land & Cattle" to a hipper, more youthful "ALC Steaks," the establishment proves itself capable of evolving along with Austin's culinary landscape while also upholding the traditions of upscale steak houses in the form of a peerless dining experience. It's the best of both old and new Austin under one roof. - Melanie Haupt

Layers of Change

STORY-CENTRIC DOCUMENTARY REVEALS THE POWER OF A CHILD'S VISION

Sometimes it takes a child to show the world a story's essence, but it takes filmmakers to document the layers as they peel back.

When Eric and Alex Harr showed their 8-year-old daughter Vivienne a photo of two Nepalese brothers holding hands atop a Himalayan mountain with rocks strapped to their heads and backs, Vivienne did what almost no one would do: She started a lemonade stand dedicated to raising money for children in debt-bondage slavery.

The photo came from the collection "Modern Day Slavery" by award-winning humanitarian photographer Lisa Kristine, who intended to document "the pain of modern day slavery and the hope of freedom, allowing us to bear witness to the most horrible abuses imaginable and the most astonishing glimpses of the indomitable human spirit." This example of visual storytelling, full of dignity and reality, had a ripple effect far wider than any of the participants would foresee.

Approximately 20-30 million people are enslaved around the world today, so though the issue is still very much relevant, it is hardly an easy subject to tackle. "Every abolitionist movement has depended on striking images and stories, and what Lisa's work does is put a face to the stories." said Maurice Middleberg, executive director for Free the Slaves, the benefiting organization of Lisa Kristine (and later, as the story unfolds, of Vivienne Harr).

Shocked by the photo, and all that it represented, young Vivienne wanted to help. "Lemonade was basically the only business experience I had, so I just went with that," she told me on the phone. Make a Stand Lemon-Aid was born, and for the next 365 days, Vivienne set up her stand and sold cups of homemade lemonade. "People think other people are so greedy and that they never want to help, but once people learn about it, everyone wants to help," Vivienne says. Once she adopted her "Pay What's in Your Heart" model, the proceeds finally started rolling in - to the tune of \$150,000. A few months in, Patrick Moreau of Stillmotion Films took notice while searching for a cause to highlight in a short film project. Fastforward a few weeks, and Stillmotion was documenting their first feature-length documentary film.

"Originally, we thought that this was Vivienne's story, and in the end we discovered it's so much greater than that. Vivienne was our invitation to explore the fact that modern-day slavery exists in the world today," Grant Peelle, creative director of original programming for Stillmotion, told me over the phone.

What sets this Stillmotion film apart is that it acts not as an exposé, but rather a story in which the filmmakers thread all of these worlds together using beautiful cinematography, a concise but effective storyline, and artistic technical choices - even a custom soundtrack featuring Vivienne's glass lemonade bottles as percussion.

By intentionally contrasting Vivienne's luck by birth with the hows and whys of families trapped by generational bonded labor, the film highlights the remarkable, relatable power of children's spirits. "We knew that Vivienne was going to be the hope in the film and that we were going to have some terribly painful images that we were going to have to share, of slavery. Those images have a different color, a different quality to them ... so you understand the juxtaposition of the two different worlds - Vivienne's world and the world of the children who are enslaved," says Peelle.

"Open conversation about inequality is half the battle for human rights everywhere," declares the narrator; the very title of the film, #standwithme, serves as a social invitation. "We have very purposely structured this film as a social invitation to be aware of the topic," Peelle says. "We encourage [people] to participate as a family and create an open dialogue about [modern-day slavery], and to evaluate the decisions and actions that they can change in order to create more freedom."

How we tell the stories matters, but what we do with the insight going forward matters most. Now 10 years old. Vivienne offers this advice to other kids who feel inspired: "Just keep going and don't let anyone squash your dreams." She continues to financially support Free the Slaves and the other organizations with the money she raises selling her Lemon-Aid, which is available at an increasing number of retailers and online at www.makeastand.com (still offered at a "Pay What's in Your Heart" price).

A Not-So-Sunny Philadelphia

AFS PRESENTS 'LET THE FIRE BURN'

For years, the inscrutable ideology and less-than-neighborly (or hygienic) lifestyle of MOVE, the radical black separatist commune led by John Africa, was a thorn in the side of its working-class Philadelphia neighbors and a defiant finger in the eye of city authorities who sought to rein it in. Following accelerating confrontations, the conflict reached critical mass on May 13, 1985, when the city finally laid siege to the MOVE compound and dropped explosives on it, igniting a fire that was, by official decision, allowed to burn, eventually killing 11 people (five of them children) and destroying 60 houses - three city blocks - in the surrounding area.

In Let the Fire Burn, filmmaker Jason Osder evenhandedly presents the political drama of the conflagration and its subsequent investigations exclusively through the use of archival footage of news coverage, including the enlightening deposition of Birdie Africa, one of only two MOVE survivors, who was 13 at the time.


Austin Chronicle: How did you become interested in the MOVE conflagration?

Jason Osder: I grew up in Philadelphia and was 11 at the time of the bombing. As a child, I experienced this in a particular way: It was the first public tragedy in my memory, and thus the

event that "woke me up" from childhood, to a wider, more troubling world.

AC: And why did you think this film needed to be made, all these years later?

JO: Well, it took me more than 10 years to make the film. So, to be sure, I would have put it out sooner! I do think that the incident (and I hope the film) provokes some moral and ethical questions that remain extremely relevant today.



AC: Having made the film. do you view the facts of the conflict differently than you did going into it?

JO: No, not in a factual way. I do think that when you make a film it is necessary to boil a difficult story down into an essential meaning not the only meaning, but one that is satisfying in the context of the film.

AC: What would you like the viewer to take away from your film? **JO:** Just to look at the world around them more critically. Where today is violence being done to people without regard for their humanity? Where are children being used as pawns in the political machinations of adults?

Period dramas are expensive. There are costumes and props and sets and horses and cannons - even the shovels need to be historically accurate. No one tell that to Ben Wheatley, the alchemist behind British 17th century historical horror and Drafthouse Films' latest release A Field in England. He made it because it was the easiest project on his slate.

The irony is that it was supposed to be a stopgap. After the success of his spree killer comedy Sightseers, he said, "We were looking at doing some stuff that's more big and expensive and increasingly mainstream." He realized that meant potentially two years of preproduction, and he started getting itchy for the run-and-gun pleasures of true indie filmmaking, as epitomized by his 2009 microbudget debut. "The main message of Down Terrace was no one can stop you making films. I have to do this, because this is my credo. I've been talking about this; I can do this."

The foppish and fearful Whitehead (Reece Shearsmith) has been dispatched by his master into the scalding cauldron of war to track down O'Neill, a mysterious Irishman (played with sneering fury by Kill List's Michael Smiley) who has stolen certain documents from him. There's no nobility or honor in this war: The tale begins with Whitehead tumbling through a hedge, fleeing battle, and discovering two corpse-pilfering deserters, Jacob (Peter Ferdinando) and Friend (Richard Glover, star of Sightseers). They are offered food and beer by the amiable Cutler (Ryan Pope) in return for one small favor: Pull a rope in the middle of the field. Yet something seems awry: Is it just the unusual mushrooms in Cutler's stew, or are there darker forces at play?

Field is set during the English Civil War, the nine-year conflict starting in 1642 as a power struggle between King Charles I and his Parliament. But ultimately, the English Civil War was no simple struggle for democracy against monarchy: King Charles was a tyrant, but the Parliamentarians, under Oliver Cromwell, cut their own gory swath across the British Isles. "There's no heroes," said Wheatley. "Everyone's a villain." That's made the conflict a difficult subject matter for many filmmakers to date. "Cromwell goes off to Ireland and causes all kinds of carnage, and that can't really be balanced, you can't have him as a hero. Obviously, Britain is in the grip of monarchy, so

it's accidentally a heroic story about killing a king. It just doesn't quite fit; it doesn't make sense."

Historians estimate that between 30,000 and 50,000 people died in the English Civil War. That number may not sound like much after the blood-soaked 20th century, but in a nation of around 5 million, when guns and bombs were an oddity, each death was a hacking, scarring, brutal act of hand-tohand butchery. Conflicts would run the fine line between tragedy and farce, like Charles' disastrous siege of the French fortress of Saint-Martin-de-Ré in 1627. Wheatley's films pick at the scabs on the British psyche. His Down Terrace, shot on a microbudget in just over a week, dissected the madness and violence in the family dynamic of English gangsters. Similarly, 2013's blood and scones satire Sightseers was Badlands with sweaters and a nice cup of tea. But Field returns to the madness of war, a theme he touched upon with his mercenary

pagan rampage Kill List. In an unexpected turn, he will direct the first two episodes of Peter Capaldi's tenure as the new Doctor Who - a gig he got in part because Field catapulted him from indie success to a major force in British cinema. Channel 4, the film's UK distributor, had so much faith in it that they launched it in theatres, on demand, on DVD, and on free-to-air TV on the same day.

Painting his story on a small canvas didn't mean he was prepared to cut corners. During the writing process, Wheatley and longtime scriptwriting partner Amy Jump researched the era heavily, ensuring historical accuracy without turning the project into a thesis. Wheatley said, "Amy was really conscious in the script to comb out things you could get caught up." That's why there's the unstated

significance of having the Belfast-born (and longtime Wheatley ally) Smiley as the malevolent O'Neill, since Cromwell's army laid waste to the rebellious Royalists of the Irish Catholic Confederation. "I don't like people doing accents or suppressing their accents," said Wheatley. Yet he had to research to find proof that an Irishman would have been part of the conflict on the mainland. He needn't have worried. "They were about the only soldiers during that period who had any combat experience."

Importantly, there's no specific time, date, or location given. "There was one press release early on in the process that put some of that shit down, but we got rid of that with everything that went out later, because it's not that important. The last thing we wanted to do was get crucified

Wheatley's concept - five men, trapped in a seemingly endless swath of grass, mud, and nettles - also helped strip back on the usual expense associated with period films. Even the costumes didn't break his meager bank. In 2008, Channel 4 had produced a Civil War epic, The Devil's Whore, and all the uniforms were in storage at London's legendary Angels the Costumiers. Wheatley said, "You'd just go down there and you'd get your choice of 1,600 costumes." Since all the characters are near-destitute, deserters, criminals, or cutthroats, and the events take place across one afternoon, he added, "No one changes their clothes, so you only have to get costumes for five guys."

Of those five, Shearsmith, as the simpering Whitehead, is likely new to most American audiences. His most recognizable role on this side of the Atlantic may be as Dexter, the pencil-mustached weekend robo-warrior of cult comedy Spaced. Yet in the UK he is a comedy icon for the darkly surreal ensemble nightmare The League of Gentlemen, appearing alongside future Doctor Who writer and Sherlock star Mark Gattis. It was his ability to create dozens of distinctive and disturbing characters that convinced Wheatley that he was "fucking great. ... He had that weird ability that De Niro had to sink into those characters, from Mean Streets to Raging Bull. I didn't know he was that guy; it was just the mole that gave it away. His range is huge, and he could do whatever he wanted." There was something distinctly English about the hiring process. "We had a few cups of tea and a chat, and I went back to Amy Jump. She's a big fan and said, 'We'll write something for Reece."

Like League, Field finds strange horrors in the rolling hills of England. But don't get distracted by the psychedelic visuals. Following in the hoofed footprints of Seventies British supernatural horror (Wheatley screened Ken Russell's 1971 historical shocker The Devils at Fantastic Fest and cited it as a guiding inspirations). Field is set centuries before anyone tuned in or dropped out, before the Age of Reason. This is an era when science, sorcery, religion, and politics were one and the same, and all are subject to ill for-

tune. Wheatley explained, "I think they would be religious in a way we could not possibly comprehend. Around that time there's stuff about holy water that could be used on sheep and about blessing the crops. It got really complicated and convoluted, and people were ready to believe anything." Yet he's not prepared to write the era's yeomans and peasants off as blind zealots, ready to be butchered for God and country. "A lot of people would just get into battle and go, 'Fuck this' and walk off. People were radical, and thinking in a much broader sense than people give them credit for."



Unlocking Infest

Infest. the Warehouse District venue occupying the former Antone's space at 213 W. Fifth, got a rude awakening last Thursday morning when locks were changed and a notice was posted on the door indicating that the landlord had taken possession of the space. Sources with intimate knowledge of the lease reported that the move resulted from outstanding rent due, which came as a surprise to Infest owners/siblings Ben and Chelsea Riseman, who say they were in communication with the landlords and believed they were in agreement on when rent would be paid.

That night, the venue's show with popular Atlanta rapper Waka Flocka Flame relocated to nearby Republic Live. According to the Risemans, the MC was advanced \$5,000 and given two SUVs to

use, but took issue with the hospitality because **TABC** regulations prevented his eight bottles of expensive champagne to be brought into Republic Live and, after refusing to take a check for his remaining payment, flipped them off and exited without performing. Attendees tell the Chronicle that the crowd

became hostile, demanding refunds. Unfazed, Waka and crew partied at Sixth Street basement club Barcelona, where the Georgia rapper put in a drunken impromptu appearance (revisit epic online report "Infest Shows Relocate -And Then Some," Jan. 31).

In the days that followed, upcoming Infest bookings were canceled or relocated, including D.O.A.'s farewell tour, which deferred to Red 7 last Saturday, and tonight's performance by Houston rap hero **Z-Ro**, now at Republic Live. While Waka promoter **Trainwreq** suggested Infest "got ousted by the old guard, which wants their building back to call it Antone's again," one of Antone's new owners. Tayloe Emery, told "Playback" he categorically denies having anything to do with Infest being locked out.

"We're looking at all available spaces right now and that building is one of them," he allowed, "but owners reached out to us, and we have no plan currently that involves moving there."

Nonetheless, a landlord locking out tenants suggests they have other interest in the huilding

Infest arrived 10 months ago, brandishing fiercely independent punk ideals, a mission statement to provide a collaborative space for musicians and artists to hold events Downtown, and just enough naivete to run a punk- and hip-hop-focused venue in the white-collar Warehouse District. They weathered notable PR disasters like a Z-Ro show where the headliner didn't go on until 3am,

and a recent pay-to-play scandal, in which they were demonized for the methods of third-party

promoters. Infest also had notable triumphs, such as accommodating

Franz Ferdinand after ACL Fest flooded and hosting an incredible fundraiser for **Dicks** frontman Gary Floyd, in which Scratch Acid/ **Jesus Lizard's David**

Yow fronted the ailing singer's seminal Austin punk act. Infest's reputation has

taken an obvious public beating, but the tougher fight may be getting back into their building, which the Risemans characterize as a complex legal matter. They're seeking counsel, but the club's future remains uncertain. In the meantime, they're moving three months of scheduled concerts to other venues.

"We're making sure to settle upcoming events so that the bands and fans are taken care of," ensured Ben Riseman.

Facebook event posts indicate that a new Eastside event space called the Badlands at 1203 Chicon has inherited some of Infest's upcoming bookings including Major League (Feb. 12), the Toasters (Feb. 16), and Maker (Feb. 19).

Psych Fest's Second Movement

The **Reverberation Appreciation Society** confirms a second wave of acts performing at the seventh annual Austin Psych Fest May 2-4 at Carson Creek Ranch. Headliner Primal Scream has fallen off the bill following news last week that the Scottish rockers canceled their U.S. tour. "The cancellation of a top-billed artist is quite a blow for a small independent festival like Austin Psych Fest," admits festival organizer Rob Fitzpatrick. "While we did our best to try and keep them on the bill after the tour got scrapped, the band couldn't make it work." In their place, the Brian Jonestown Massacre, which headlined Psych Fest two years ago, and Dandy Warhols, the former act's co-stars in essential rock doc Dig! This second vetting, which comes in the wake of the APF's initial Dec. 4 announcement, heralds the return of Nigerian guitar slinger Bombino, who pairs nicely with fellow Saharan desert rockers Terakaft. Other notables joining previously announced psych festers Loop, the Zombies, the Horrors, Of Montreal, Black Lips, and Black Angels include garage-pop idol Mikal Cronin, Swedish retro-metallers Graveyard, and TV on the Radio side project Higgins Waterproof Black Magic Band. The Octopus Project leads a list of new locals: Pure X, Holy Wave, Roger Sellers, and Mirror Travel. Other new additions include Temples, Night Beats, Warlocks, Peaking Lights, Pink Mountaintops, the Fresh & Onlys, Bardo Pond, Asteroid #4, Sleepy Sun, Cosmonauts, Indian Jewelry, Elephant Stone, Golden Animals, Morgan Delt, Mark McGuire, Secret Colours, Doug Tuttle, and Les Big Byrd. "We know it will be the best year yet," enthuses Fitzpatrick, "regardless of this bump in the road."



BEHRENS & BISMEAUX

Ghostland Observatory frontman **Aaron** Behrens has signed with Bismeaux Records. the local label owned by Asleep at the Wheel boss Ray Benson. Behrens' new rock project, the Midnight Stroll, debuted last October at ACL Fest, bearing little resemblance to the glow stick electro-pop of Ghostland, which had been inactive for over a year before popping up on a bill near Denver at **Red Rocks** last Friday. Bismeaux manager Peter Schwarz confirmed that Behrens has been given free reign of the company recording studio, where he's rerecording/tweaking Midnight Stroll's debut, produced last year by former **Lions** frontman Matt Drenik. "We're letting the creative thing incubate," says Schwarz. "He'll know when he's got the record he wants. I think there's no limit to what he could do. I wouldn't be surprised to see him win Best New Artist at the **Grammys** after this record comes out." Meanwhile, Behrens' Bismeaux labelmate **Carolyn Wonderland** recently joined **Stooges** guitarist James Williamson in the studio to sing on a vintage Iggy Pop/Williamson track for an upcoming release.



Sonobeat Records

New book links the late-Sixties local label and today's burgeoning scene renaissance

If the aural history of Austin music resembles a sprawling tabletop jigsaw puzzle, its center - Willie Nelson, Armadillo World Headquarters, Stevie Ray Vaughan - remains fairly complete with a few outstanding holes. Yet the frame, one that seems easy to assemble with its linear border, features gaps of outstanding significance.

Maybe that's because so many books on the storied local scene tend toward the coffee-table variety, lovingly staged portraits of favorite musicians and/or dazzlingly lit images of the town's storied nightlife in action. The keepers are often the more modest revelations like Michael Corcoran's CD-book package on turn-of-the-century pianist Arizona Dranes (revisit "Raising Arizona," Oct. 26, 2013), which introduced the blind gospel singer not only to Austin, but to the world at large, while reminding all comers that musical education is vital to children.

Ricky Stein seeks that same brand of rawhide authenticity in his new book Sonobeat Records: Pioneering the Austin Sound in the '60s. What began as a casual conversation with a colleague during his internship at KLRU turned into a deep immersion in the roots of Austin's recording history in the Sixties - the eventual topic of his American studies thesis at UT. From where, wondered Stein, did the impetus for the Texas state capital as a musical force originate? He found a cornerstone in Sonobeat Records.

Born in 1967, the year the Vulcan Gas Company opened on Congress where Patagonia now occupies the space, the label folded in 1976 as America celebrated its bicentennial. In those nine years, Sonobeat Records documented the changing face of Austin - and Texas - music. The indie sought not only to record the young rock bands of the era, but to capture the live aspect of a broad spectrum of music from jazz and hotel music to club house bands.

"An innocuous conversation ended up a published book," marvels Stein. "The fraternity scene [for example] was a real revelation to me. [Contributing photographer] Layton DePenning says that was the scene before there was a scene, and the way musicians paid their bills. It was a party scene with dance bands, no artistic pretensions about it. They just wanted to have a good time."

And a good time was had, "they" being the local high school and college kids of the Sixties. In a phenomenon that occurred 50 years ago and has never been repeated since in popular music, the world changed overnight in February 1964 with the Beatles' U.S.

tour and television appearances. Elvis shook it up a decade before, but not until the British invasion did hip-shaking assimilate itself into popular culture. Across the nation, the kids just wanted to rock and roll.

Enter the long-overlooked father/son team of Bill Josey Sr. and Bill

Josey Jr., founders of Sonobeat Records. Both worked for popular FM station KAZZ, where Josey Sr. served as station manager in 1965 and the younger Josey later held court on the airwaves as disc jockey "Rim Kelley." A younger son, Jack Josey, eventually joined the on-air family, yet Sonobeat's dynamic sense of what was hip to record lay between Josey Sr. and Josey Jr.

It sounds impossibly dated now, but Bill Josey Sr. revolutionized the listening experience of Austin youth when he initiated live broadcasts from the Sheraton Crest Motor Inn (now the Radisson) on Lady Bird Lake. A two-microphone mixer allowed him to speak into one mic while the other captured the music. A direct phone line connected them back to the studio. This format led to acts such as Roky Erickson's psychedelic pioneers the 13th Floor Elevators being broadcast into suburban homes from such places as the New Orleans Club, 11th Door, Club Saracen, and the Jade Room.

> The rising popularity of local rock bands such as the Sweetarts (with contemporary scene veteran Ernie Gammage) and Lavender Hill Express (starring the late Rusty Wier) provided the Joseys with a wealth of homegrown talent to launch their new venture Sonobeat Records in 1967. The Lee Arlano Trio, Vietnamese singer Bach Yen, and jazz vocalist Fran Nelson added traditional appeal to the stable, while James Polk & the Brothers and Afro-Caravan deepened the label's roots.

Some projects played into the Joseys' hands like vinyl kismet. An article on Texas music in a 1968 Rolling Stone, featuring photographer Baron Wolman's icon-

"Winter's career just took off," reports Stein, "The Progressive Blues Experiment album Sonobeat recorded at the Vulcan went on to major label distribution with Liberty Records and a bidding war ensued for his next record."

The 128-page book contains a few common but minor errors: A photo of the old tour bus that once decorated the Broken Spoke parking lot is identified as Bob Wills' bus, yet the Flex Cruiser belonged to Western swing band the Texas Top Hands, whose name painted the front. Another short-lived but significant local label, Domino Records, sees its chief act the Slades misspelled as "the Slates." And because the slim tome originated as a thesis, the tone occasionally comes across as pedantic.

None of these quibbles negate the impact of this publication. Sonobeat Records connects the nascent Austin music scene of 50 years ago with the bustling circus it is today. Stein includes interviews from participants like Wali King, leader of Afro-Caravan, who points out one of the most salient reasons for the spotlight being turned on Austin in the mid-Sixties: President Lyndon Baines Johnson hailed from Texas.

"With LBJ coming in behind Kennedy," comments King, "and him being the person that was pushing all the Great Society things, Austin was kind of one of those places that felt like they were a direct representative of LBJ. And as a result of that, the town had much more of a liberal attitude."

Stein also champions Sonobeat for its expansive approach to the varied genres the label recorded.

"What also interested me was the Eastside scene of the same time," explains the author. "There's been literature about it, but not as much attention paid to it as, say, the Vulcan scene. That's a credit to Sonobeat. They had so much diversity in the acts they recorded, like the Afro-Caravan and James Polk & the Brothers alongside releases by the Sweetarts and

Lavender Hill Express. Afro-Caravan could play Eastside joints and the Vulcan. They fit both scenes equally."

In retrospect, Sonobeat's output sounds limited -24 vinyl singles and two full-length albums - but bear in mind that the tal-

ent pool was considerably smaller in those days. Bill Josey Sr.'s dogged belief in what the label recorded remained strong and committed, even after the younger Josey married and moved to Houston in 1970.

When the end came in 1976, and because he dedicated himself to the art of recording music instead of making profits, the patriarch lav in his casket in a blue polyester leisure suit. It was the only suit Bill Josey Sr. owned.

ic portrait of Doug Sahm on the cover, proclaimed Beaumont-born albino guitarist Johnny Winter "the hottest item outside Janis Joplin." The Joseys were well aware of Winter's blues prowess, having recorded the LP that introduced Winter to the world, The Progressive Blues Experiment. Never mind that the recording took place at the Vulcan Gas Company during the day and that the "audience" consisted of the Joseys and Vulcan artist Jim Franklin, with Winter, future Double Trouble and Arc Angels bassist Tommy Shannon, and drummer Uncle John Turner performing. The Progressive Blues Experiment became a landmark for Winter and stands as Sonobeat's lasting legacy.

Scott H. Biram Nothin' but Blood (Bloodshot Records)

Austin's notorious one-man band returns with equal measures of gospel and Gomorrah on his eighth LP, Nothin' but Blood. Delivering a motormouth baptismal rap on "Gotta Get to Heaven" and the Christ-conjuring country choir of "When I Die" on the same saturated platter as piss-drunk altercation "Only Whiskey" and an especially horny adaption of Mance Lipscomb's "Alcohol Blues," Scott H. Biram both rages and reflects. Such angel/devil duality remains a hallmark for the local bluesman, who also offers intimate acoustic ballads like "Slow & Easy" and "Never Comin' Home" that let you walk a mile in his roadworn Velcro loafers. A joyride of country runs,



supercharged thrash riffs, and distorted blues licks that would make R.L. Burnside slap his thigh, the disc also boasts Biram's finest guitar work, exemplified on blues/metal/bluegrass instrumental "Around the Bend" and a brilliantly spooky take on Texas slide standard "Jack of Diamonds," where you can hear evil spirits rising from the F-holes of his well-traveled Gibson. Though it lacks a masterstroke, offering nothing as triumphant as "Victory Song" or as heartwrenching as "Still Drunk, Still Crazy, Still Blue" from 2009's Something's Wrong/Lost Forever, this may be Biram's sturdiest collection of songs since 2006 peak Graveyard Shift. Capturing the anything-goes spirit of his hell-raising live performance, Nothin' but Blood opens a vein.

Simple Circuit

All hail the return of Inhalants bassist Lisa Rickenberg to the local stage. While Simple Circuit still parks in the garage, it's not sharing a twocar space with the



late, lamented, local intoxicants. Simple Circuit fires synapses of every art school graduate to have navigated UK punk's exhilarating first wave: Buzzcocks, Wire, and especially the Fall. In fact, singer/guitarist Kevin Hoyas veers so far into Fall leader Mark E. Smith's lane. a paternity test should likely be performed. Hits like "Hey Young Minds" and "Sattrash" certainly bear the hallmarks of Smith's obtuse song-craft, but tangy guitars and the pounding, nimble rhythm section Rickenberg anchors put enough of the band's fingerprints on these songs that they need never fear lawsuits from Elastica. Following two fine singles and an appearance on Casual Victim Pile II, Simple Circuit delivers one of the finest debut longplayers to stumble out of Beerland.

Jazz Mills EP 1

If her name doesn't ring a bell yet, Jazz Mills' voice might. Founding member of Cowboy & Indian, collaborator with over 30 locals



Western bass line, and bursts into dueling harmonies - Patsy Cline on the upbeat. Mills' lower register is rich and her equally intriguing head voice incorporates a unique, lovely vibrato, both on full display in "Meet My Father." Soaring highs and confident lows atop rolling piano and easy percussion make this old-fashioned love song a keeper. "Red Hot Mama" offers straight flapper jazz, complete with an Édith Piaf trill, while "Pop Song" reflects Sixties retro mod. Ten minutes only, but they stick.

deEP end

After eight years riding shotgun with Asleep at the Wheel, Elizabeth McQueen makes a U-turn. Reworking songs from her solo jazz LP, 2010's The Laziest Girl in Town, the local honky-tonker teams up with St. Louis guintet Brothers Lazaroff to add atmospheric grooves across six tracks on The Laziest Remix. Her vocals still slink and pop on the Cole Porter title track and "You're to Blame," but braced with Lazaroff's eclectic riffs and up-tempo back-beats, "Gone Solid Gone" cuts experimental funk and hip-hop, and "Just Let Go" soars against a bed of noise. On her own once again, McQueen proves ever entrancing and always a surprise. Johnny Dango's (Sort of) Nice Dreams likewise marks a solo move, this one from local rock outfit the Memphis Strange into the calmer roots of his follow-up to 2007 LP Let's Go Pioneering! Dango cuts tender with "All My Dreams" and "The Hardest Part," while "No One Like Me" and "Together or Alone" lay sad and dark like nights in the back of the bar. Arrangements remain refined and ethereal, allowing Dango's unexpectedly soft tenor to guiver evocatively even as warped instrumental closer "All My 'Robot' Dreams" feels out of step. Joel Laviolette & Rattletree continue their infectious marimba evangelization on Joy, five tracks slicing the traditional African instrument with electronic impulses. The opening title track races with marimba runs to set the pace, but unique covers of Dead or Alive's "You Spin Me Round (Like a Record)" and Joanna Newsom's "En Gallop" best capture the energy and playfulness of the local quintet, the latter crooned with an almost Eighties darkwave vibe. Original "Something in Dande," written with Zimbabwean virtuoso Newton Gwara, calms against aggressive beats on closer "Blood Red," capping a diverse sampling of Rattletree's inventive reach. — Doug Freeman

Kellye Gray And, They Call Us Cowbovs: The Texas **Music Project** (Grr8 Records)

These songs remain well-worn evergreens, virtually all written by native

Texans, but we've never heard them quite like this, interpreted through a jazz prism by Austin veteran Kellye Gray. After stints in Houston and San Francisco, she's back in town with this self-produced homage to the likes of Kris Kristofferson ("Help Me Make It Through the Night"), Townes Van Zandt ("If I Needed You"), and Roy Orbison ("Only the Lonely"). Along with a slew of local stalwarts, Gray fashions her own alternatively spunky and after-hours sensibilities to these Lone

Star gems. Guitar ace Jake Langley plays the blues, funky on Mac Davis' "In the Ghetto" and low-down for the singer's smoldering take on the Willie Nelson-associated "Always on My Mind." Red Young digs down on Hammond B-3 organ for a soulful jaunt on Roger Miller's "Dang Me," while pianist Kevin Lovejoy gently beautifies Gray's smoky ballad reading of the opener, "Help Me Make It Through the Night." Jay Trachtenberg

Phranchyze 3

This online album doubles as Phranchyze's seventh in four years. Though certain releases have boasted more original production



than others (August 2012's Phranye West), they've all been of the same ilk: clever and charismatic, with a penchant for rusticity. 3 spreads out from a cooler vein than many of the South Austin MC's past releases, incorporating synth-heavy production ("I Got," "Igloo") from Rawtid Tunes and FrescoThaProducer that wrap wide around Phranchyze's narrow flow. Issues of cultural displacement ("Oreo," "Weirdo," "Close to Me") dominate typical bombast ("Doper"), but it's no surprise that the album's anthem comes at the end, on the Tameca Jones-assisted "Can't Change." That one values production most. Such reliance would benefit Phranchyze's next go-round. *** - Chase Hoffberger



Gleeson

Gleeson II (Almost There)

Even when they turn out to be lousy with filler, there's something innately exciting about cracking the seal on a double vinyl album. Who can resist the allure of four-sided high-rock ambition and a grand gatefold to stare at (or roll a joint on) while listening? So crackles the spirit of Gleeson's second LP. Function follows form as the local sixpiece, led by Almost There Records enthusiast Ty Chandler, incants snatches of Exile on Main St., Goodbye Yellow Brick Road, and ELO's Out of the Blue onto a loose narrative comprised of ragged pop songs, beer-light piano balladry, and ornate pop exclamation points augmented by strings and horns. "Fall" and "Spring," the respective set-pieces that open each disc, set a wistful tone that carries throughout, while pocket operetta "Queen of Boulevards" intertwines glam and vaudeville. The strategic fiddle solo on "Better on My Own" embodies solitary stoicism in a blizzard of closing-time guitar fuzz. Front to back, Gleeson II stacks a heck of a ride.

To build an iron ore smelting plant in Iceland in 2009, Alcoa Inc. was forced to kowtow to the country's national obsession that elves ("hidden people") live underground and that construction projects must assure that the little fellas have had a chance to scatter gracefully to new habitats. Alcoa hired the necessary elf-monitoring "engineers," and eventually the project proceeded. In December 2013, the government announced it was temporarily abandoning a major road project connecting a remote peninsula and the capital of Reykjavik after it was "learned" that the route would disturb an "elf church." The likely outcome, again, according to an Associated Press dispatch, is that the project will resume once the elves have relocated.

GOING POSTAL

America's returning warriors continue to experience inexplicable difficulty after putting their lives at risk for their country. It took 13 vears for Army Sgt. Mai. Richard Erickson to get his job back from his civilian employer after he took leave in 2000 to serve in the National Guard special forces. The employer soon fired him for taking "excessive military leave." The employer? The U.S. Postal Service, for which Erickson worked as a window clerk (and which was forced to reinstate him after a January 2014 ruling awarding him \$2 million in back pay). Erickson had won several interim victories, but USPS fought each one, extending the case, and said in January that it might even appeal the latest ruling.

RECURRING THEMES

Happy New Year: 1) Once again, celebrants in France marked Jan. 1 by setting fire to 1.067 cars nationwide (down from 1.193 the previous Jan. 1). 2) In the Hillbrow neighborhood of Johannesburg, South Africa, celebrants apparently decided to abandon a 20-year-old tradition and not hurl furniture from high-rise apartments. (The Hillbrow custom was highlighted on one social-networking website, along with the New Year's graveyard gathering of relatives in Chile and Ireland's banging bread on walls to dispel evil spirits.)

Holy Mutations: Deformed animals born in developing countries often attract streams of pilgrims, seeking to touch a creature considered divinely blessed. In December, a fivelegged cow in Raipur, India, had supposedly "caused" the last 30 women who touched it to give birth to boys. And a day after that report came one from Phuket, Thailand, in which a newborn gecko with six legs and two heads has become a magnet for visitors seeking clues to winning lottery numbers.

In November, the Journal-News of Hamilton, Ohio, examining various police union contracts in the state, learned that in several jurisdictions, officers are allowed to work their shifts even when less sober than some drivers whom they ticket for DUI. In Lebanon, Ohio, for instance, cops can work with a .04 blood-alcohol reading. In Butler County, a .04 reading triggers legal protections for officers that are unavailable to ordinary drivers. (However, in Lebanon, an officer's right to suck on a breath mint before taking the test was recently removed from the contract.)

Judges as Romantics: 1) In December, Italy's top appeals court awarded a new trial to a man, 60, who had been convicted of having sex with an 11-year-old girl. Evidence had been excluded that the pair were having an "amorous relationship" with "feelings of love." 2) Alabama Judge James Woodroof of Limestone County, given two separate chances in December to sentence Austin Clem, 25, to jail time for raping a girl beginning when she was 13, both times opted for probation. (The no-jail sentences perhaps reflected that Clem's family and hers continued to socialize after the rapes.)

The Continuing British Campaign to Abolish Risks: 1) Britain's Royal Mail announced in December that it would stop delivery to Jeff and Sheila White's cottage in Carnforth because the carrier was frightened of cows. (Mrs. White said he was just lazy, in that when the cows were present, the carrier had to open and close a gate to get to their cottage.) 2) A 65-year-old school crossing guard resigned in October from a job he said he liked because officials at Manadon Vale Primary School had ordered him to stop playfully "high-fiving" students. Guards, the school said, need both arms free to hold signs and make proper signals.

"News of the Weird" has reported the emerging mainstream treatment (for various bowel disorders) of fecal transplants, in which a healthier relative "donates," via enema, supposedly healthier microbes to a sickly patient to normalize intestinal activity. The process, still strange to many patients despite its apparent success, has become so popular that in October Canadian officials felt the need to warn patients not to perform amateur transplants. Said one mother, after successfully having her 10-year-old daughter treated, "I think one day ... we will have fecal-matter banks like [blood banks and sperm banks]."

Unclear on the Concept: In December, after Carmen Reategui, 34, was arrested for DUI in Readington Township, N.J., and was too impaired to drive home, she called Nina Petracca, 23, who arrived at the police station impaired herself (and was arrested for DUI), and both women called Ryan Hogan, 33, to take them home, but he also arrived impaired and was arrested.

Classics: 1) Jamal Garrett, 29, was arrested in Antioch, Calif., in January after he tried to rob a Wells Fargo bank, police said, but had fled empty-handed after a teller struggled to read a poorly written holdup note. (She and her manager said they did not even know immediately if it was a holdup or just a note requesting assistance.) 2) Daniel Severn, 27, pleaded guilty to burglary in England's Hull Crown Court in December, for trying to enter a home through the roof but getting trapped, upside down, in the bathroom. He dug his phone out of his pocket, but it fell into the toilet, and he remained hanging for an hour and a half until a resident arrived and found him.

'NEWS OF THE WEIRD' UPDATE

Unrelenting, swastika-tattooed New Jersey neo-Nazi Heath Campbell, 40, saw child No. 9 born in November, and once again, the county family welfare office removed it almost immediately. "I'm not allowed to have children because I'm a Nazi," he lamented. Campbell first made headlines in 2008 when a bakery declined to decorate a birthday cake for his son, Adolf Hitler Campbell, leading child welfare officials to investigate, and more seizures followed, now including the November-born Eva (Lynn Patricia) Braun. Campbell told reporters he would continue to fight for offspring. "I'll stop making them when they stop taking them."

A Field in England

D: Ben Wheatley; with Julian Barratt, Peter Ferdinando, Richard Glover, Ryan Pope, Reece Shearsmith, Michael Smiley. (NR, 90 min.)

It begins with cannonades, musket fire, smoke, and presumed-to-be-dead men walking. It ends deep in the titular field, awash in howling winds,

treachery, and madness. And it's yet another marker in English director and co-writer (with Amy Jump) Wheatley's exemplary catalog of films that are unlike any you've ever seen. Wheatley's newest is unapologetically psychedelic in both tone and tempo. The director plays havoc with the story's timeline, intentionally befuddling the audience alongside his equally bedazzled, bedraggled characters. A Field in England might not be to everyone's taste, but it's far and away the most enticingly original film to come out of the UK this year. (It killed at Fantastic Fest 2013.)

On the face of it, A Field in England is a seemingly straightforward story about a quartet of men (played by Shearsmith, Ferdinando, Pope, and Glover) trooping off to an alehouse during

the English Civil War, and the nightmare that befalls these damned souls once they encounter O'Neil (played by Wheatley regular Michael Smiley), a catty sorcerer seeking something buried in the Earth. That description pales in comparison with the actual mind-warping surreality that plays out (in crisp, trippy, black and white, no less) even during the film's opening moments. Jump and the genuinely visionary cinematic strategies of Wheatley will blow your mind out of your unsuspecting skull. A back-flashing musket ball couldn't scramble vour grav matter any better - and the results would be neither as sumptuous nor as painterly as Wheatley's infinitely arresting camera eye, which is aided and abetted by cinematographer Laurie Rose.

As in Bastrop, Texas, so too in 1648 Surrey, England: Psilocybin mushrooms are devoured in haste, which offers the characters entry into heaven and hell, possibly simultaneously. Comedy, chaos, and a veritable smorgasbord of astonishingly beautiful camerawork ensue. But Wheatley affords his audience no simplic-

ity nor easy answers even in



In many ways, A Field in England is a funhouse mirror of audience expectations and something of a filmic Rorschach test. What is all this hue and cry about, really? It's about what you think it's about. Wheatley offers no easy explanations. There as here, God, politics, and the devil rain down nothing but moldy crumbs for an all-too-starving - or in this case, thirsty - mankind. The lesson, just one among many: Be careful what you hunger for, lest it swallow you alive.

NEW REVIEWS

D: Sebastián Lelio; with Paulina García, Sergio Hernández, Marcial Tagle, Diego Fontecilla, Fabiola Zamora, Antonia Santa María. (R, 110 min., subtitled)

So rarely are middle-aged women the subjects of movies that it seems ungrateful not to genuflect when one of these exceptions comes along. Although this Chilean film's narrative ambitions are modest, Gloria is a likable movie that's anchored by an outstanding performance by Paulina García - whose work here was recognized with the Best Actress award at last year's Berlin Film Festival. Appearing in nearly every frame of the film, García imbues the eponymous character with an unquenchable thirst for life - which seems alternately audacious and foolhardy.

Divorced for more than a decade, Gloria is a woman in her 50s who's on good terms with her two grown children and their families. She works, goes to yoga class, and sings along with the tunes pumping out of her car radio. She lives alone, and at home she's pestered by a neighbor's wild rantings that penetrate her apartment walls and a hairless cat that continually invades her space despite being regularly tossed out. She also goes by herself to dance in clubs, and maybe find a partner, if only for a moment. Gloria's life seems open and full, yet unexceptional. When she meets Rodolfo (Hernández) - a recently divorced, middleaged man - she at first seems wary but then opens up her life to him. After he disappoints her not once, but twice, Gloria appears to take it in stride. No histrionics about the one who got away, just a simple return to the dance of life - literalized by the character stepping out on the disco floor to shake her leg to a foreign-language version of Laura Branigan's hit song "Gloria."

We are never privy to Gloria's deepest inner thoughts, so she remains something of mystery. We can admire her resilience and unwillingness to get bent out of shape over a romantic affair gone bad. It's also refreshing to see two middle-aged bodies engage in sex. But like the disco sounds that accompany the end of Gloria, this film seems a bit superficial. - Marjorie Baumgarten ***

THE LEGO MOVIE

Let's go out on a critical limb, shall we? The Lego Movie is the best thing to come along since that other toy-centric movie revolutionized animated films about 20 years ago. Smart and savvy, it takes the classic dilemma of every Lego owner - to follow the instructions or not to follow? – and constructs a wild-ride fantasy of colorful, interlocking plastic bricks only to deconstruct it in the most amazing way possible. Most animated

films deliver their third-act homilies about the value of friendship or the strength of family to the 8-year-olds in the audience seemingly for their parents' sake; these tacked-on messages of socially redeeming value do little but dilute the cartoony insanity that precedes them. But in The Lego Movie, the tug of war between individuality and conformity is one with the Lego. (The film's nods to Star Wars and The Matrix are more than just pop-culture asides.) What initially appears to be a nonsensical story about an ordinary minifigure named Emmet, who joins forces with a cadre of Master Builders to save Legokind from the evil Lord Business (who's plotting to take the snap out of things with Krazy Glue), later resonates with depth and feeling when it segues into the real world of rigid fathers and their imaginative sons. It all fits together seamlessly, in a way you don't see coming. And all the while, the film is one big advertisement for the multicolored building blocks from which it's made. The Lego Movie may be the shrewdest marketing ploy you've ever seen.

Granted, the animation looks a little scruffy and unpolished, given the inherent imitations of the rectangular elements used to assemble the film. (Emmet and the other minifigures - Batman, Unikitty, Shaquille O'Neal, and Abraham Lincoln, to name a few - aren't so geometrically restricted; they look more like sophisticated versions of Fisher-Price characters.) But the computer graphics have an endearing, stop-motion quality to them, one that's a couple of notches above the jerky South Park but several below the digital sleekness of a Pixar flick. (The hilariously awkward movement of the horses in the Wild West section of the film also recalls the claymation poise of Gumby and Pokey.) Even the nonsolid substances in the film - water, dust, smoke, soap lather - are elaborately depicted with Lego pieces, making for some really funky animation sequences. And, of course, there's nothing better than watching buildings in Legoland explode and crumble into a million pieces ... literally. Kudos to the filmmakers for staying true to form, so to speak. More so, kudos to their imaginations for connecting the pieces to make such a funny and sharp animated movie that speaks to kids and adults alike. To quote the favorite song of the once ordinary, now extraordinary Emmet, "Everything is awesome!!!" Indeed, it is.

THE MONUMENTS MEN

D: George Clooney; with Clooney, Matt Damon, Bill Murray, Cate Blanchett, John Goodman, Jean Dujardin, Hugh Bonneville, Bob Balaban, Dimitri Leonidas. (PG-13, 118 min.)

George Clooney has proven to be an interesting director (Confessions of a Dangerous Mind, Good Night, and Good Luck.) as well as a reliably strong actor whether in typical Hollywood star turns (the Ocean's trilogy) or in riskier, more daring roles (The Descendants, Gravity). All of which makes The Monuments Men such a perplexing film. It finds Clooney directing and starring in a bizarre vanity project that exists because he wanted to make it, and he managed to attach an all-star cast.

FILM LISTINGS

The film is not without its charms - many, in fact. Frank Stokes (Clooney) convinces the U.S. president that saving the art treasures of Europe, which have been looted by the Nazis, should be an Allies priority. Granted the commission, he organizes an odd platoon of art experts to undertake the mission, but instead of misfits and perverts, Stokes gathers a Dirty Dozen-type team of academics and professionals (museum curators, a sculptor, and an architect). This group is played by Damon, Goodman, Dujardin, Bonneville, and Murray and Balaban as an oddly comic duo. The film is painted on the grand scale of World War II, an epic landscape of military equipment, armies, and destroyed villages to tell a rather tight and much simpler detective tale: tracking down and rescuing art. Rarely has a militaristic production this grand not been concentrated on war.

The failure of The Monuments Men is in its lack of coherence. Clooney's irregulars are desperately trying to find the stolen art treasures of Europe not only before the retreating Nazis destroy them but also to get to them ahead of the advancing Russians, who are just as interested in claiming them. Maps are shown but there really are no recognizable geographic logistics in their race. We are told where we have been, where we are, and where we're going, but there is no interior logic to the film by which this makes sense.

The film is loaded with great scenes. That's no surprise, since this terrific cast turns in excellent performances. There are many fine moments, some suspenseful ones, any number of comic scenes, as well as a few that are touching and moving. There is a sweet subplot involving art curator James Granger (Damon) and embittered Parisian art connoisseur and accused collaborator Claire Simone (Blanchett).

Ultimately, however, this film is a collection of vignettes in search of a narrative center. Although it's enjoyable, the film never coheres into a whole. Instead, it resembles a pile of ill-fitting jigsaw-puzzle pieces rather than a fully formed picture.

OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT **FILMS 2014: ANIMATION**

D: Various. (NR, 102 min.)

Animated programs are often hit-and-miss affairs, as are most collections of shorts. Often, if they are made up of 10 or 12 shorter films (averaging six or seven minutes each), they can be overwhelming. This year's Oscar-nominated animated shorts mostly run longer than 10 minutes, making for a more involving program. Each of the films is expansively stylized, boasting - to no one's surprise - superior, ambitious animation.

"Possessions," by Shuhei Morita, is based on a legend in which tools and inanimate objects gain souls after a century. The film is a richly detailed evocation of all kinds of Japanese symbolism and ritual. A journeyman worker comes upon a small cabin in the wilderness. Seeking shelter within, he

encounters a "Sorcerer's Apprentice" fever dream of multiplying objects engaging in Busby Berkeley dance numbers. Visually magnificent, "Possessions" is an explosion of colors and action that drenches the senses.

Told with more muted tones, yet somehow more stylized and impressionistic, is "Feral" by Daniel Sousa. The film tells a story about a wild child who is found in the forest by a hunter and brought back to civilization. His introduction into a school environment goes about as well as might be expected.

"Mr. Hublot," by Laurent Witz and Alexandre Espigares, is a futuristic fantasy about a genial robotic world where inhabitants, houses, and transportation are constructed out of pieces from the most richly imagined Industrial Age junkyard. The title character somehow adopts a (robot) dog, bringing a genuine warmth to this elaborate mechanical world.

"Room on the Broom," by Max Lang and Jan Lachauer, tells the most classic kind of animated fairy tale about a witch and her cat. They end up picking up any number of hitchhikers on their broom, much to the feline's dismay. Charmingly clever, it also features the voices of Simon Pegg and Gillian Anderson

The most startling and exciting of the films is Disney's remarkable "Get a Horse!" by Lauren MacMullan. Starring Mickey and Minnie Mouse, along with Clarabelle Cow and Horace Horsecollar, it begins as a remarkably faithful Thirties-ish Disney cartoon in which the main characters on a hayride are

confronted by the evil Peg-Leg Pete driving a road-hogging jalopy. Pete, eyeing Minnie lustfully, soon kidnaps her. The film then rips apart its flat, two-dimensional, black-andwhite surface, exploding in every direction as the stars mutate into colorful, threedimensional, CGI characters. It's reminiscent. to some extent, of the mind-boggling Warner Bros. postmodernist, animated masterworks like "Duck Amuck." With much love and even more imagination, this cartoon (the shortest of the bunch) literally tears it up. It violates rules of space, time, and traditional narrative structure as it becomes a joyous anarchistic celebration of animation and Disney's history while also exploring the form's potential.

The program also includes three "highly commendable" shorts: "A La Francaise," "The Missing Scarf," and "The Blue Umbrella," which were not available to screen.

OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT **FILMS 2014: DOCUMENTARIES, PROGRAM A**

D: Various. (NR, 95 min.)

The three Oscar-nominated short films grouped in this program tell remarkable stories of how very different people react to oppression. Sara Ishaq's "Karama Has No Walls" documents a peaceful sit-in protest of the regime in Yemen's "Change Square" that turned violent when thugs built a wall that trapped protesters in and then opened fire. There are four interviewees: two fathers whose sons were at the protest, and two teenaged cameramen who were shooting that day in 2011 - Nasr Al-Namir and Khaled Rajjeh. Their footage is used throughout; it's a testament to their bravery and the strength of their political convictions that they kept shooting; at one point, you can hear Rajjeh praying, clearly fearful for his life, but he never stops rolling camera.

Jason Cohen's "Facing Fear" examines a hate crime from the perspectives of victim and attacker. Cohen takes pains to contextualize the attack, with both men explaining how they were shaped by family traumas and how they individually arrived at an alley in Los Angeles, where Tim Zaal was one of 14 neo-Nazi punks with razors glued to their boots who viciously attacked Matthew Boger, a homeless teenager who was thrown out of his house for being gay. Decades later, the two men reconnect by accident. (The moment, as it's described, is blood-chilling.) The story of how Boger not only forgave Zaal, but came to think of him as family, is so striking and surreal, there's material enough here for a feature-length film.

Malcolm Clarke's "The Lady in Number 6" is a straightforward rendering (cozy British voiceover included) of a most extraordinary life: that of Alice Herz-Sommer, a former concert pianist and the world's oldest Holocaust survivor. (She was 109 at the time of filming, and still tinkling the ivories.) The film charts her childhood in Prague, where Kafka and Mahler were family friends, to her imprisonment at the Theresienstadt concentration camp and the loss of so many loved ones. Still, Herz-Sommer has maintained a sunny outlook on life. "I am full of joy," she beams. What a lady. **** - Kimberley Jones

OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT FILMS 2014: DOCUMENTARIES. **PROGRAM B**

Two short documentaries, each of which runs about 40 minutes, are included in this program. Each film introduces us to a memorable character.

"Cavedigger," by Jeffrey Karoff, points its lens at a man named Ra Paulette, who carves out caves from the soft and ubiquitous sandstone found in northern New Mexico. It seems a singular artistic endeavor, even if it evokes visions of the Anasazi cave dwellings which dotted the area centuries ago. What Paulette carves, however, seems more fit for use as a cathedral than domicile. The carvings take years to complete and feature passageways, soaring walls into which designs are carved, and skylights that allow a person to have the anomalous sensation of being deeply underground yet exposed to the heavens. It goes without saying that Paulette

is a man possessed by his visions – more an artist than a structural engineer, though what he does shares elements of both.

The other film in the program is "Prison Terminal: The Last Days of Private Jack Hall," by Edgar Barens. Hall, who was a decorated soldier and POW during World War II, now spends his days in prison for life after murdering the person who sold his son drugs. Hall's heart and lungs are failing, and we observe his last couple of weeks of life as the prisoner is moved from the infirmary to the prison hospice. A rare thing, this prison hospice is an exemplary model with its rogues' gallery of life-term murderers who function as the unit's loyal and sensitive caregivers.

Both documentaries feature intriguing characters, although they share a similar tendency to indulge their subjects. Tighter storytelling would probably enhance both shorts, but they receive extra credit for introducing us to characters who remain vivid after the lights come up in the theatre.

OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT FILMS 2014: LIVE ACTION

D: Various. (NR, 113 min.)

This year's quintet of Oscar-nominated, live-action short films is, as ever, a mixed bag of issue-oriented filmmaking, whimsical magical realism, dark comedy, and just plain fascinating offerings that straddle the blurred line between playful and deadly serious. Much like short stories, short films are a painstaking and difficult milieu to inhabit. Creatively, they can be the stepping stones to full-length, narrative feature films (see Austin filmmaker Kat Candler's recent Sundance entry Hellion), or they may remain milestones in the director's career. All five of this year's Oscar-nominated live-action short films are worthy of your attention and, thanks to everevolving distribution platforms, they're easier than ever to see and appreciate.

Denmark's entry, "Helium," directed by Anders Walter, makes the most of emo Oscar bait with a fantastical deathbed storytime initiated by a hospital janitor (Casper Crump) and an ailing 10-year-old named Alfred (Pelle Falk Krusbæk). The only film in the program that features extensive CGI animation, it draws much of its afterlife imagery from Antoine de Saint-Exupéry's *The Little Prince* and Winsor McCay's early 20th century comic strip *Little Nemo*. It's heavy on the heartache but the dreamy zeppelins and overall tone are less morbid than maudlin.

In UK director Mark Gill's "The Voorman Problem," Sherlock and Hobbit star Martin Freeman is a psychiatrist interviewing a prisoner (Tom Hollander) who believes himself to be a god. A cagey comic short featuring another utterly believable turn from Freeman, it's a one-note gag that works perfectly.

From France, director Xavier Legrand's "Just Before Losing Everything" is a short, sharp, shock of a film in which a battered spouse (Léa Drucker) and her two children attempt to flee the family's vicious paterfamilias with help from the mother's supermarket co-workers. Streamlined and intense, with an eerily ambiguous ending, it's of note that producer Alexandre Gavras is the son of Costa-Gavras (Z). Suspense and social issues run in the family's veins, apparently.

Spanish entry "That Wasn't Me" gets the Amnesty International seal of approval for its disturbing examination of an African child soldier and the aid worker (Alejandra Lorente) who suffers a fate worse than death – sort of – by his hands. Director Esteban Crespo displays a deft hand while invoking the brutality of war and its tentacular reach into noncombatants' lives.

Finally, Finland's outright farce "Do I Have to Take Care of Everything?" from director Selma Vilhunen, tackles the hilarious attempts of a harried mother (the excellent Joana Haartti) to get her husband and brood ready for a wedding. It may be the lightest fare on this year's live-action shorts menu, but it's also entirely charming, goofy, and an upbeat note in an overall darker series of films.

THAT AWKWARD MOMENT

Idiots and assholes. Those aren't my words. Somebody in *That Awkward Moment* is forever calling somebody else either an idiot or an asshole. It's a wonder they all stay friends, even with their bond forged back in college. The viewer, not beholden to any of these idiots and/or assholes, may be quicker to call it quits.

Former teen idol Zac Efron plays Jason, a twentysomething book-jacket illustrator who keeps a steady, ready roster of no-strings hookups. Teller plays Daniel, Jason's professional partner and first wingman. When the marriage of their other best friend, Mikey (Jordan), breaks up, the trio makes a pact to avoid relationships altogether and enjoy the spoils of being single in New York City.

Efron is still finding himself as an adult actor. He's certainly charismatic, but here it's all surface: He delivers every line like he's hawking cologne, and there's no demonstrable difference between his early horndog persona and the supposedly reformed guy he becomes by the end of the movie. Teller and Jordan's performances are more subtle, more dynamic. For the movie's producers, the real awkward moment must have been the realization that these two rising stars are effectively playing backup to Efron's boy band.

Some movies famously were found in the editing room (*Anhedonia* becomes *Annie Hall*); there's circumstantial evidence that this movie was lost there. But that's mere speculation, and maybe too much generosity bestowed on first-time writer/director Tom Gormican – the missteps may have already been there in the shooting script. The three leads' distinct storylines are metered choppily,

there's an illogic to the scene sequence and plotting, and that initial pact, casually arrived at, is suddenly framed as a game-changing bet late in the film. Most awkwardly, the tone whirligigs between toxic-dude bromides, hard-R slapstick, and earnest swings at romanticism, mostly whiffed. (Idiots and assholes early established are hard to rebrand.) There's probably a movie out there that can call a happy, anatomical truce between Viagra-hopped, horizontal-dick jokes and heart-on-the-sleeve love stuff, but this ain't that.

O THE ACT OF KILLING

D: Joshua Oppenheimer, Christine Cynn, Anonymous. (NR, 122 min.) "History is written by the victors." However, in this canny documentary, Winston Churchill's truism gets a makeover. The Act of Killing allows its victors - former Indonesian death-squad leaders who assisted in a violent national purge between 1965 and 1966 - a forum to elaborate on their story. Following a military coup in 1965, it's estimated that one million Indonesians were killed by the army, civilian paramilitary groups, and independent gangsters. Anwar Congo and his friends were among those recruited in North Sumatra to carry out the mass killings. Joshua Oppenheimer and his co-directors take the curious tack of having these men re-stage their former exploits for the screen, with touches inspired by their favorite movies. The more these men boast about and reenact their former deeds, the starker the reality that's before us becomes. I guarantee that you've never encountered any screen figures as memorably disturbing as these men. (08/09/2013)

It's all about the hair, the performances, and the grift and graft in this unpredictable new offering from David O. Russell. A dark comedy loosely based on the FBI's Abscam sting operation in the late Seventies, this entertaining take on the American art of reinvention delights in the era's sense of fashion without distracting from its dysfunctional collision of con artists, undercover agents, and mobsters. Players get played; scammers get scammed. At its heart, American Hustle is a love story between two inherently dishonest people - street-smart Irving Rosenfeld (Bale) and faux-British poseur Sydney Prosser (Adams) - who need to trust each other to survive. Russell has an unerring talent for drawing out the best from his actors, and everyone here is in top form. Special mention, however, is reserved for Lawrence's mesmerizing turn as Irving's nut-job spouse Rosalyn. She's a true original, a rara avis with beautiful plumage. (12/20/2013)

This comes right before Beverly disappears entirely from the movie, although it's his very absence that triggers the dispersed Weston clan to flock to the side of his acid-tongued wife Violet (Streep). In the days that follow, old scabs are torn off, new wounds are inflicted, a longkept secret is revealed, and ves, plates are thrown. Adapted by Tracy Letts (Bug, Killer Joe) from his Pulitzer Prize-winning play, August: Osage County is a madhouse unto itself. The film's ensemble cast really kicks out the jams, and there's a certain lurid pleasure in watching them peck away at one another. Survival – emotional and physical – is the endgame in August: Osage County. "Thank God we can't tell the future," observes Violet's daughter Barbara, "or we'd never get out of bed." (01/10/2014)

Like *The Little Mermaid*, this animated film mines Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tales for mate-

rial, discards the most brutish bits, and applies a heavy Disney top gloss. Frozen doesn't benefit from the above comparison (it ranks a distant second), but the film can count in its favor visual grandeur, two energetic young women as co-leads, and a couple of above-average plot twists. Screenwriter/ co-director Jennifer Lee hooks an empowerment story around two fire-and-ice siblings - eldest Elsa (voiced by Menzel), who can control snow, and Anna (Bell), a blithe chatterbox who is unaware of her sister's powers until Elsa accidentally plunges their tiny Nordic kingdom into endless winter. When Elsa self-banishes to a hermetic life on top of a mountain. Ii'l sis chases after her, bringing along an anti-social ice merchant (Groff) and a sweet, dim. sentient snowman, whose spirit - pure of heart, noble in intention - carries throughout the film. Team 10 - accompanying Luttrell are Michael Murphy (Kitsch), Danny Dietz (Hirsch), and Matt Axelson (Foster) - were dropped into northern Afghanistan with the aim of taking out a particular Taliban leader. But, before long, the SEALs are surrounded by armed Taliban fighters, and the film spares nothing in showing the fragility of flesh as the team fights for survival. Barbara Lynn

Barbara Lynn, who turned 72 last month, was born in South Texas' Golden Triangle region of the Gulf Coast. Beaumont to

be exact, where she still resides today. Playing its clubs as a southpaw teen guitarist, she barely clocked 20 years old when her first single, "You'll Lose a Good Thing," soared to No. 1 on the *Billboard* R&B chart and No. 8 on the pop chart. Before she knew it, she appeared on Dick Clark's *American Bandstand*. Twice.

In the ensuing years and decades, neither being a woman nor Sixties civil unrest slowed her down. "You'll Lose a Good Thing" was later covered by Aretha Franklin and Texas legend Freddy Fender. One of the greatest thrills of Lynn's career was when one particular artist called her up personally to get permission to cover another of her tunes.

"Mick Jagger called me at my manager's office," she recalls by phone from Beaumont. "My manager said to $\!\!\!$

me, 'There's someone I would like you to talk to, Barbara. His name is Mick Jagger.' I said, 'You mean the Mick Jagger with the Rolling Stones?!' He said, 'Yes ma'am.' Jagger told me, 'I'm here to collaborate with your manager and ask you if it's all right with you for us to record your song "Oh Baby (We Got a Good Thing Goin')."'

"I told him, 'You have my full permission!'"

While Lynn stepped back from music to become a mother, as a grandmother she's still rocking loud and hard, bringing it with the gusto she's had her entire career. Her grandkids' band, the Johnsons, are also on the bill, along with the Soul Supporters and DJ Topper James. She's a powerhouse performer, a woman of great tales, and full of joyous laughter.
