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
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






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

They are careful with the animals, recently halting allowing kids to feed the rays for a couple of weeks to evaluate their health. So I believe the animals are being treated well. Given all of the


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
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

MUSINGS ON THE DAY AFTER A FROZEN VOTE

Congratulations to the winners.

Let that uncontroversial lead open the entirely premature discussion of Tuesday's Texas primary elections. It's still too early to tell – but pundits are already heaping dirt on the Democrats' and gubernatorial nominee Wendy Davis' fall chances. They were never very good in the first place – barring a miracle not yet in evidence, this

remains a Republican state but the relatively lower statewide Dem turnout and Davis' failure to win some South Texas counties (over Corpus Christi political hobbyist Ray Madrigal) are being pointed to as more evidence that the state Democratic Party is still not ready for prime time. That, too, is probable - but the notion that the South Texas Hispanic vote is going to lurch GOP-ward in November is horse-race reporters' wishful thinking.

Certainly Davis' team is learning quickly that running statewide is very different from running in Fort Worth with a local political brand name. In some quarters, she might well be perceived as a single-issue candidate - which the GOP's unsubtle "Abortion Barbie" campaign will try to confirm – but she's got the better part of a year to undo that impression. She's already begun emphasizing education on the stump; my early guess is, by the fall, voters will have a much fuller notice of who she is and

what she's about, and moreover, Dem voters won't stay at home presuming she's a shoo-in.

More alarming was the second-place finish of Lyndon LaRouche-ite Kesha Rogers in the Dem Senate race, meaning she'll have another couple of months of free media publicity to spread conspiracy-mania and related nonsense before being dispatched by David Alameel. With five candidates in the race,

a run-off isn't surprising, but it calls attention once again to the party's inability, over the last couple of decades, to develop a trusted bench with electable candidates. Every new campaign, the search starts again from scratch.

No Bridge Too Far

Beyond that, Texas Republicans have their own problems. As expected, Attorney General Greg Abbott had no trouble dispatching his ragtag opponents, and the same is true of Sen. John Cornyn - although a 60% showing for a longtime incumbent is not exactly dazzling, he didn't get Cruz-ed after all. The real GOP mania showed in the Lite Guv race, where Sen. Dan Patrick handily trounced incumbent David Dewhurst, 41% to 28%, in what amounts to a replay of Dewhurst's hapless showing against Ted Cruz himself.

On actual policy questions, there's no significant difference between Dewhurst and Patrick, but every time we think the GOP can move no further to the right, they manage to do so. (Witness all four of the candidates declaring that the only possible medical exception for abortion should be the life

Headlines

- > City Council meets today (March 6) with a less than bulky agenda made thinner by postponements and Mayor Lee Leffingwell's absence (off on a London junket); nevertheless, grandfathered development rights and the Fiesta Gardens/Festival Beach master plan are scheduled for public hearings.
- The mayor is in England to confirm the "sister city" relationship with the London borough of Hackney (approved last week) - actually, British Airways offered him a ride Monday evening on the new **Dreamliner** nonstop service to London, and he couldn't turn it down.
- There was anger at some ballot boxes Tuesday, as some Travis County voters found themselves casting provisional ballots. Bad weather led the county to delay the start of voting until 11am, and extend hours until 9pm. However, all votes cast after 7pm were provisional, a fact few knew when they headed to the polls.
- > By this morning, the dust should have settled on Tuesday's primaries, and the die is cast for a November gubernatorial showdown between Wendy Davis and Greg Abbott. See a postmortem on Tuesday's local contests, p.14.
- > The extended voting hours made for a long night for County election watchers. The early returns allowed for early celebrations in the commissioner races, but Andy Brown didn't concede the Travis County Judge race to winner Sarah Eckhardt until midnight.
- **Austin Firefighters Association President Bob** Nicks said Tuesday that he is "encouraged" that an item that would have Council agree to a consent decree between the city and the Dept. of Justice concerning firefighter hiring practices has been indefinitely delayed, while all the parties involved move into mediation (see "AFD Hiring: Smoke or Fire?" Feb. 28).
- ➤ Laissez les bons temps rouler so long as you appoint a designated driver: Austin Police made 39 DWI arrests over the no-refusal Mardi Gras weekend - including a Friday afternoon bust made by Chief Art Acevedo.
- **SXSW Interactive** announced a major virtual addition to its lineup: Edward Snowden, currently in exile in Russia after his massive leaking of U.S. and UK security documents, will speak via video-conference on March 10 on the need for technologists to push back against surveillance culture.
- > The Texas Bar Association's Office of Chief Disciplinary Counsel has accepted a prosecutorial misconduct complaint filed in January against former Burleson Co. DA Charles Sebesta by Anthony Graves, who spent 16 years in prison for a multiple murder he did not commit, a conviction based on perjured testimony. Sebesta has 30 days to respond, after which the OCDC has 60 days to issue its decision (see "Holding Prosecutors Accountable," Jan. 21).
- > Jen Sorensen, whose strip runs in the Chronicle every other week, won the Herblock Prize for editorial cartooning March 4 - the first woman to win the prestigious award.

of the mother - neither rape nor incest now make the ideological cut - laughably outside the mainstream, even in Texas, but now subject to Tea Party discipline.)

Where radio talk-show host Patrick stands out - in addition to the fact that he's simply "Not-Dewhurst" - is that in keeping with his latest chosen trade, he's a Gantrytype huckster. GOP primary voters don't mind that he's patently fake in mannerism and rhetoric, and carries a history of failed and even hypocritical (i.e., immigrantstaffed) businesses. On abortion, immigration, education, etc., he spouts the hysterical talk, and that's all that matters. For AG, they chose mad-right Ken Paxton (44%) over generally pragmatic Dan Branch (33%) for the same reasons (although it's at least dimly possible that Branch can garner enough of Barry Smitherman's 22% to catch Paxton in the run-off). Similarly, the ideologically purist Glenn Hegar (49%) is the de facto nominee for comptroller over the more realistic Harvey Hilderbran.

Right now, it's simply impossible to run too far to the right in a GOP primary. As the state demographics shift, that may spell long-term doom for the future of the GOP. But where most of us live, in the middle term, it means a continued reactionary system of state governance, with little sense of broader obligation to the common good.

All in This Together

Any hopeful signs? Well, there's at least an outside chance that this is finally the Year of the Woman, with Davis and Leticia Van de Putte heading the Democratic ticket, and, at the local level, the ascendance of Sarah Eckhardt and Brigid Shea in the Commissioners Court. I'm no fan of Manichean politics - the explicitly "Good vs. Evil" strategy inaugurated in the Nineties by Newt Gingrich, and henceforth installed as the permanent ideological position of the GOP. Eckhardt, perhaps feeling isolated by the institutional Democratic support for her opponent, increasingly adopted a scorched earth campaign, defining all opposition to her candidacy as illegitimate and secretly allied with sinister corporate interests.

It apparently worked, and she handily defeated a seemingly favored Andy Brown. But if we've learned anything from our national polarized politics, it's one thing to campaign as though politics is war; it's another to govern with that perspective. Eckhardt's a tough, smart, experienced attorney, politician, and county executive, and I believe she'll make a fine county judge. I hope her campaign hasn't made it that much harder for her to do so.

By and large, Travis County remains a blue island in a red Texas sea, with a few bright spots here and there, but it's still a sleeping giant of so many potential voters turning their backs on the entire process. An imposed culture of cynicism has steadily undermined our larger sense of community and common governance. Let's hope we get beyond that self-destructive indolence before it's too late.

It's Our Turn Now

WOMEN ARE READY TO KICK ASS, TAKE NAMES, CLEAN HOUSE

"I'll summarize the county judge race this way: women."

That was David Butts' quick analysis of Tuesday's Democratic primary race that gave **Sarah Eckhardt** a 10-point victory over her better-funded opponent Andy Brown.

It's no secret that qualified women candidates generally, but not always, carry an automatic advantage in competitive Democratic races. But with last year's legislative assault on women's reproductive rights and Wendy Davis' historic filibuster,

there emerged a fired-up base and a greater sense of urgency to put more Democratic women in office.

And, indeed, on Tuesday, Travis County women turned out in greater numbers, just as they have historically done in every other primary election, to vote for women candidates up and down the ballot, from Davis and Leticia Van de Putte at the top to Eckhardt in the middle.

"Andy's job was to convince women that he was a good choice, and all the women who supported him [including reproductive rights champion Sarah Weddington made that effort," said Butts. But for a lot of female voters who are not connected to the inner workings of the political world, neither the endorsement of Weddington, nor the backing of Congressman Lloyd Doggett and Kirk Watson, both popular with women, were sufficient to sway the majority of the 44,226 who cast ballots. (Provisional ballots cast between 7-9pm still need to be tallied.)

'CAUGHT IN THE BACKWASH'

In truth, Brown was the more – how shall we put this - approachable candidate, the more natural campaigner – but Eckhardt's gender and experience carried the day by a surprisingly wide margin. Most women I know went with Eckhardt for precisely those reasons, even if they had been put off by her somewhat confrontational style - she can be a hardass, I'll give her that, but by my sights we could use a few more like her minding the store, not giving it away.

Sarah Eckhardt at Whisler's "I think Andy had a

superior get-out-the-vote effort, but what I was detecting in the final days was that people male and female - were telling me that they had planned on voting for Andy, but they were beginning to think

Sarah had more qualifications. That's a real warning sign that all of a sudden things are shifting," Butts asserted. "Not that all of them voted against Andy, but enough of them did that switched, and unfortunately Andy, who is a very good person, just got caught in the backwash."

Eckhardt's victory - which last year seemed a formidable prospect - makes her the presumptive successor to County Judge Sam Biscoe, who beat an equally qualified female candidate in the late Nineties to clinch the seat and held on to it all these years. Eckhardt is expected to trounce her little-known GOP opponent, Mike McNamara, in November to become the first woman to hold the county judge position.

The year-of-the-woman scenario played out in other local races, too. Brigid Shea knocked off two male contenders to win Eckhardt's former Precinct 2 County Commissioner seat, and Treasurer Dolores Ortega Carter fended off the popular, wellfunded Ramey Ko to retain her seat.

Butts, a veteran political operative who's sometimes scorned for having too heavy a

hand in local campaigns, didn't side with one candidate over another in the county judge race because he, like a lot of people, is friends with both Eckhardt and Brown, the former head of the Travis County Democratic Party. (My dream is that Austin will someday have the female equivalent of a David Butts or - shudder - a Peck Young.) Like every other political junkie in town, Butts followed the hotly contested race every step of the way and spent most of Tuesday evening and part of Wednesday digesting the returns. His preliminary findings show that Eckhardt won both female and male voters (the latter by a smaller margin, he suspects), and Brown won the African-American vote, thanks in large part to the endorsement of Congressman Lloyd Doggett, who is popular among black voters. As of Wednesday, Butts was still looking at the Hispanic vote and other demographic groups.

The most marked shift in the campaign came Feb. 18, at the start of early voting. Butts sensed a change in the race that had initially been Brown's to lose. While Brown picked up the endorsements of former and current political leaders, big labor groups, and swept the Democratic clubs, Eckhardt won the coveted endorsements of both the Statesman and the Chronicle, published as early voting got underway. "That was a huge deal," Butts said. The double header coincided with two "pretty good" mailers the Eckhardt campaign sent out. "It was right at that juncture that the trend line started heading her way."

FENCE MENDING

Eckhardt should immediately reach out to Brown and his supporters and try to heal a few wounds. "The thing that she needs to do is the thing that she's not been the best at and that's sit down and talk with people," advised Butts. "Her failing, if she has one, is that she has a tendency to make up her mind and then proceed a certain course without talking to all of the engaged parties, and that's what she needs to learn, if she hasn't already." To be sure, there's a lot more Monday-morning quarterbacking over how Eckhardt should work to restore Democratic unity heading into November.

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Travis County Judge: Eckhardt 'Pitches' a Winning Race



A long and brutal slugfest to attain the Travis County Judge seat ended late Tuesday with former Precinct 2 Commissioner Sarah Eckhardt taking the prize in a clear 55-45 win over Andy Brown. The victory came at the end of a weird Election Day, hobbled by an early morning freeze that forced polls to open four hours later than the usual 7am start time. It took a court order to extend the polling hours to 9pm - and every vote after 7pm, under state law, became a "provisional" vote, to be formally counted only if necessary. Eckhardt waited out the returns at Whisler's, formerly known as Rabbit's, once a popular watering hole of politicians and Eastside locals.

Eckhardt - who in November faces little-known but perennial GOP candidate Mike McNamara - is the presumptive successor to long-serving Judge Sam Biscoe, who retires at the end of the year. Brown, as the former chair of the **Travis County Democratic** Party, had been endorsed by several key Austin political figures, including U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett and Sen. **Kirk Watson**, and had strong support from labor groups. Brown raised more money, topping out at over \$730,000, including in-kind contributions, and structurally appeared to have the better machine. But Eckhardt, who raised

\$447,000 including a loan she made to her campaign, trumpeted her experience, and challenged Brown's ties to influential donors, some of whom had earlier given to Eckhardt's campaigns during her six years on the Commissioners Court.

The race grew its most polarized in the final 10 days, with both campaigns turning up the heat several notches. Asked why the contest had turned so bitter, Eckhardt said: "We're an urbanizing county with over a million people, and now, the county judge's position has become very important and highly prized by a lot of very important interests. I was not at all surprised that this became a pitched campaign."

While Eckhardt got off to a late start in a campaign that hit more than a few bumps along the way, the Democratic nominee credited her campaign staff's teamwork. "I grew up in politics and in campaigns," said the daughter of former Congressman Bob Eckhardt. "It's rare that you have a group of people who work so well together and are so nice to each other. There was very little unnecessary drama."

Defeated Brown Looks Toward November

Just after the release of the early vote count, a little after 9pm, the mood at **Andy Brown**'s election headquarters – a big ramshackle house on Waller Street – was not somber, but certainly subdued. Trailing by about six percentage points, Brown and his campaign manager, **Jim Wick**, had seen (and run) enough campaigns to know that making up a margin of roughly 1,500 votes on election day – while not impossible – would be an uphill climb. "I think that will be pretty hard to come back by on E-day," said Brown frankly, chatting in a quiet room above the crowded first floor. "But we had a strong GOTV effort today, so I guess we'll

see." He was characteristically soft-spoken about his immediate prospects, and already looking past this race.

"I'm glad at the way we campaigned," Brown said. "We stuck to the issues, and my team ran a great race. Democratic primaries always get heated, but I think we always come back together after the primary's over, and we campaign for the ticket in November. I look forward to doing that." Asked if he had any specific notion why Eckhardt was leading, he smiled wryly and said, "My hunch is that more people voted for her."

As the night wore on – and the election day numbers failed to arrive – the standing

room-only crowd diminished a bit, still waiting. Incumbent (and newly re-elected) Pct. 4 Commissioner

Margaret Gómez stopped by, as did Congressman Lloyd Doggett, fresh from monitoring a couple of intense San Antonio races at the other end of his district. Doggett

remained upbeat, and noted, concerning his early endorsement of Brown, "I had two friends in the race, and I had to pick one."

By midnight, sufficient returns had trickled in to convince Brown there would be no latehour comeback, and he phoned his congratulations to Eckhardt.

Wednesday morning on the phone, Brown was audibly exhausted, and quietly resigned to his loss. "I'm proud of my team and the outreach that we did and the issues we talked about," he said. He thought he would be buoyed by election day results and higher turnout, but it just hadn't happened. Asked

about the tone of the race, and specifically Eckhardt's attacks on his supposed ties to "special interests," he said he was "disappointed" in the campaign's direction: "I don't think that's good for turnout or the party; I think it's better to have a healthy debate about issues, and that's what we tried to do." Pressed to elaborate, Brown answered in keeping with both his low-key style and his long personal dedication to the Democratic Party. "I wish Sarah the best," he said, "and I think she's going to do a great job as county judge."

Precinct 2: Shea Wins in a Walk

Brigid Shea's supporters had just started gathering at **Scholz Garten** to watch the election returns when the early vote results handed an early victory to the Precinct 2 Travis County commissioner candidate.

A couple of months ago, a run-off appeared possible in the three-way race that included immigration attorney **Richard Jung** and longtime Democratic activist **Garry Brown**, but that dynamic changed a few

weeks ago when the Shea campaign broke from the pack to try to win without a run-off.

Shea took 65% in early voting, gained a bigger bump on Election Day, and ended the night with 66%, followed by Jung with over 19% and Brown with 15%. "I'm so humbled," Shea said, crediting her campaign staff, "an army of volunteers," and her family for helping her secure the seat that **Sarah Eckhardt** vacated last year to run for county judge, and

that is currently occupied by interim Commissioner

Bruce Todd.

While there were some minor flare-ups between the competing candidates, the hopefuls mainly stuck to issues important to the Central and North Austin precinct and the county at large. "I said all along that

Brigid Shea takes a congratulatory phone call at Scholz. my opponents really are good guys, and I mean it," Shea said. "I think they both conducted themselves well. There were a few moments of friction but by and large [the race] was very civil and I think they made their case well."

Shea, of course, entered the race with the higher profile, having challenged Mayor **Lee Leffingwell**'s reelection bid in 2012. She served one term as a city council member after successfully leading a 1992 voter referendum to pass the Save Our Springs ordinance to protect Barton Springs, and remained active in community issues.

Water, and the region's shrinking supply, was also a theme of her campaign this time. But Shea says her first order of business is to tackle **affordability**, specifically the skewed state law that places a greater property tax burden on homeowners than on commercial property owners. "A tremendous amount of work needs to be done leading up to the next legislative session," she said. "I have lost track of the number of people who've told me they're going to have to sell their house and move. People can't afford to pay their taxes because the system is broken."

In another, less competitive commissioner's race, Precinct 4 incumbent **Margaret Gómez** handily fended off challenger **Darla Wegner** with 73% of the vote. — *Amy Smith*

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The Long Shots

GARRY BROWN AND RICHARD JUNG

About 8pm, an hour before the polls closed (late), followed by an elongated wait for the final count, Pct. 2 commissioner candidate Garry Brown hosted a quiet crowd at Sherlock's on Research Boulevard. Optimistic as always, he reiterated his hope that he would "make the run-off" in his three-way race, most likely with veteran campaigner and front-runner **Brigid Shea**. Without a vote yet counted, he called it "50-50," and said he's "worked too hard, for months on end, longer than anybody else" not to be optimistic about the outcome. And he continued to hope that his ground game, largely staffed by volunteers, still had a chance. As for the rest of the Democratic primary slate, he said, "I'll be very happy when the county judge race is over. There's bad mojo all over that race, and sadly, because [Andy Brown and Sarah Eckhardt] are both friends of mine, both good people."

Later Tuesday evening, after the early returns showing Shea an easy and outright winner, Brown was frank: "This is what happens when your opponents [Shea and attorney **Richard Jung**] out-raise you 10 to 1." He said his team had done everything they could, and he thanked his opponents "for keeping the race about the issues." He said he'll get some rest, "but I've still got a job, working for Constable **Sally Hernandez**."

A few miles away, at **Chinatown-Mopac**, Jung presided over a lively, packed crowd on the restaurant's second floor. He was also hoping for a run-off, and said, "as a new candidate, our reaction at the doors has been very, very good. I think a run-off is a very real possibility, and we're prepared for that as well." Beyond that, he was already musing about the overall effect of his run. He made a point of thanking his campaign team, "particularly the young people, who have been working and knocking on doors in 32 degree weather, sleet, and rain." He said he's proud of bringing along the local Asian community: "They're energized and participating; I want to maintain that going forward, so the Democratic Party has support from all different sectors of the people."

Finally, after the foreboding early returns, Jung returned to what he called most important about his campaign: addressing "issues of poverty, and how they underlie ... everything that's problematic in Travis County – transportation, education, health care. Win or lose, I'd like to see us focus on those issues – to try to help working-class families, and people living in poverty in Travis County." – Michael King

RAMEY KO: CHEERFUL TO THE END

As it happened, County Treasurer candidate Ramey Ko shared the Chinatown venue with Jung, and as the early returns arrived, he trailed incumbent **Dolores Ortega Carter** by about six percentage points - a margin that finally wouldn't shift much on election day. The ever-effervescent Ko remained optimistic, and seemed delighted to have run a good race and done his best. The campaign had gotten bitter near its end - the two candidates throwing sharp charges and countercharges at each other – but Ko was upbeat. "I've spent some time in Chicago," he said, "so I've seen a few nasty campaigns. If this is what Austin calls a nasty campaign, I can live with it." - Michael King



Austin's New (No) Sex Institute

A quick scroll through the Austin Institute for the Study of Family and Culture's website makes one thing clear. Much of the "thinking" in the recently established think tank concerns what goes on in bedrooms. A now viral video walks viewers through "The Economics of Sex," a research report details masturbation practices, and another looks at how asexual Americans use pornography. It's the type of research that is not uncommon in the social sciences, but for a carefully obscured difference. In this research, the conclusion seems to come before the hypothesis.

The first indication of the bias comes from the staff. The members of the institute all have ties to the religious right. Director **Andrew Litschi** is the former assistant director for the **Lumen Christi Institute**, an "organization that seeks to advocate and support intellectual work in relation to Catholic tradition." Communications and Operations Manager **Gina Sunukjian** can be found as a panelist on **Biola University**'s "Love Matters: Defining the Relationship" chapel series – arguing in part that romantic comedies can lead to a premature development of sexual desire.

The research fellows are even more entrenched in the movement. **David Gordon**, a Brigham Young University graduate and former LDS missionary, surfaced from academic anonymity with a post on the ultra-conservative **Witherspoon Institute**'s blog, a defense of Simon Fraser economist **Douglas Allen**'s flawed study of the high-school graduation rates among children of same-sex couples. **Catherine Pakaluk**, who assisted with the study, was listed – as recently as last week – in the "Circle of Experts" at the **National Organization for Marriage**-associated **Ruth Institute** – an organization dedicated to "making marriage cool," mostly by frequent iteration that same-sex marriage is *uncool*.

UT Professor Robert Koons, well-known as a conservative in the academic freedom debate, works with the Texas Public Policy Foundation, a Koch Brothersfunded Austin think tank, heavily devoted to right-wing legislation at the Capitol, and which was also instrumental in Sen. Ted Cruz's rise to power. Brigham Young economist Joseph Price, also involved in the graduation rate study, was among the academic signers of an amicus brief filed in support of the Supreme Court upholding California's Proposition 8.

However, those fellows have contributed little to the Austin Institute's current output. For now, the institute seems to be a showcase for UT sociology professor **Mark Regnerus**' work. The AI offices are located a few blocks from Regnerus' campus office, leading some to believe that



the institute was a reward for his widely criticized "New Family Structures Study." The 2012 study drew negative conclusions about children raised by gay and lesbian parents, despite surveying few respondents who grew up under stable same-sex partnerships. The "apples-to-oranges" approach attracted near-universal rebuke, including public letters from the American Psychological Association and many of Regnerus' colleagues. Nonetheless, the study became an instant cudgel in the culture wars, and is frequently touted by anti-gay groups like the Family Research Center. The study even appears to have played a role in the passage of Russia's draconian anti-gay laws.

The activist bent of the fellows suggests Litschi's characterization of the institute in a November 2013 Daily Texan article may be obfuscation. In that article, Litschi

denies that the think tank has any desire to sway legislation. In an emailed statement, he frames AI's work as purely intellectual. "The Austin Institute has worked with a range of academics," Litschi says. "Those listed as fellows and many not. We place tremendous value in the intellectual project of the university and the academic freedom permitted to all scholars, regardless of their viewpoint. We remain dedicated to research and education, as that is essential to our mission."

Yet Regnerus was a state's witness this week, testifying in favor of upholding Michigan's state-constitutional ban of same-sex marriage. Joseph Price also testified for the state as an expert witness. Regnerus has been particularly active lately on that rhetorical front, briefing the Hawaiian legislature as part of the marriage equality debate and speaking at Franciscan University. At the Franciscan event, Regnerus claimed that same-sex marriage normalizes "sexual novelty," including, apparently, dreaded heterosexual anal sex. He also flatly stated that gay adoption

is as "mean" as abortion.

If Regnerus' focus on the hot button issues of abortion, same-sex marriage, and childbearing seems familiar, that is because it shares those concerns with Robert P. George's "Manhattan Declaration," a 2009 manifesto that vows civil disobedience to society's increasing liberality on social issues. The connection is not tenuous. George spoke at AI's first event, "Five Pillars of a

Decent and Dynamic Society." He is also a co-founder of the **Witherspoon Institute**, the major funder of the Regnerus study. Another co-founder, **Luis Tellez**, is listed as a director in AI's state filings, along with local right-wing businessmen **Kurt Schroder** and **Eric Stumberg**.

Those connections allude to what may be the next step for the nascent think tank: the creation of a polemic mill already being called the "Witherspoon Institute South." A promised survey project titled "Relationships in America" provides some hints. The effort "seeks to understand how American adults navigate and think about the significant relationships in their lives, especially romantic ones." Given the foregone conclusions exhibited in the "Economics of Sex" video, largely culled from Regnerus' research, one shouldn't expect surprising results. — Brandon Watson

Council: Are You Suddenly Sleepy?

Today's **City Council** meeting agenda (March 6) is a little thinner than anticipated, with a couple of postponements for tactical reasons, and because Mayor **Lee Leffingwell**'s out of town. By now he should be en route back from London, on the Boeing 787 nonstop **Dreamliner** service inaugurated Monday by British Airways. Leffingwell hopped the Monday red-eye to London – destination borough of **Hackney**, now Austin's sister city, official sources say – and won't be back until Friday (wouldn't miss SXSW).

Council members got the news at Tuesday's work session, and at the mayor's request postponed official discussion of Item 4 – a proposal to increase the **property tax exemption** for homeowners disabled or over

65. But they discussed it anyway, and a couple of members got the vapors when they considered Deputy Chief Financial Officer **Ed Van Eenoo**'s projections of the long-term cost of raising the exemption, at least in larger amounts – because the budget hit will be compounded over time.

Preemptively postponed, after the original scheduling, had been the potential consent agreement with the U.S. **Department of**Justice over **Austin Fire Department** hiring. That's moved into mediation involving the DOJ, the city, the **Austin Firefighters Association**, and the **Equal Employment Opportunity Commission**. The AFA called the mediation "wonderful news," because the union is hoping to avoid an imposed solution

by either the feds or city management; presuming the mediation goes well – an uncertain prospect – any proposed agreement would go before union members for a vote.

That leaves a fairly diminished agenda (only 41 Items), with Mayor Pro Tem **Sheryl Cole** wielding the gavel, although public hearings are indeed scheduled on always contentious vested ("grandfathered") development rights (Item 39), and the perhaps less disputed master plan for about 100 acres along Lady Bird Lake: **Fiesta Gardens/Fiesta Beach**.

Beyond that, everybody loves a good resolution. This week, we've got Item 24 (sponsored by CM **Kathie Tovo**) to create a task force – the "**Austin Generation Resource Planning Task Force**" – to address the revised **Austin Energy** Resource, Generation, and Climate Protection Plan. Item 22 is

(truly) more fun: Sponsored by Mayor Pro Tem Cole, it is the first official encouragement of a potential **Major League Soccer** franchise for Austin (first reported in "Soccer Watch," Feb. 28). The proposal is extremely preliminary, asking the staff for a "feasibility" study to engage all stakeholders (including UT-Austin, the **Austin Aztex FC**, and neighborhood groups) and consider possible locations. (Could we have MLS football just in time for urban rail?)

In any event, this week's meeting might actually adjourn before bedtime. But not before a tune from honored musician "Little Brave" (aka songster Stephanie Macias), as well as a proclamation recognizing Narcolepsy Awareness Day (March 8), inaugurating its latest incarnation, "Suddenly Sleepy Saturday." Nap on that.

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Springsteen Sues for Innocence - in Bexar County

More than four years after the dismissal of the capital murder charges filed against him in connection with the notorious 1991 vogurt shop murders. Robert Springsteen has filed a civil case in Bexar County district court, asking that a judge make a finding that he is actually innocent of that crime. "Without a judicial declaration of innocence, there is no recourse for the innocent who are wrongly accused or convicted," reads the suit, filed in December 2013.

Springsteen was one of four men charged with committing, as teenagers, the horrifying murders of four teen girls - Eliza Thomas, 17, sisters Jennifer and Sarah Harbison, 17 and 15, and Amy Ayers, 13 on Dec. 6, 1991, inside a North Austin yogurt shop. Eight years later, Springsteen, 16 at the time of the murders, and his high school acquaintances Michael Scott and Maurice Pierce, also then 16, were charged with capital murder. (A grand jury twice declined to indict a fourth teenager, Forrest **Welborn**, as an accomplice.)

The state sought, and received, a death sentence for Springsteen in 2001; a year later, a jury returned a verdict of life for Scott. Pierce spent more than three years in jail before the charges against him were dismissed for a lack of evidence. (Pierce was shot and killed in 2010 by an Austin Police Department officer during a struggle after fleeing a traffic stop; the officer was cleared of wrongdoing.)

The convictions of Springsteen and Scott were ultimately overturned. The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals ruled that the prosecutors had violated the suspects' constitutional rights; after marathon police interrogation sessions, both Scott and Springsteen had confessed, including the admission by Springsteen that he had raped Ayers. The subsequent discovery in 2008 of two unknown male DNA profiles taken from vaginal swabs of the slain girls cast considerable doubt on the confessions. Although the state has tested hundreds of men connected to the case, including the original four suspects, boyfriends of the girls, and other acquaintances, no match has ever been found for either profile.

District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg reluctantly dismissed the charges against Springsteen and Scott in 2009, while maintaining that they remain prime suspects. The state's new theory, apparently, is that the four boys were aided by two additional, unidentified accomplices. Although the APD told the Chronicle in 2011 that its a investigation was ongoing, it appears that the case has again gone cold (see "Scene of the Crime," Dec. 16, 2011).

In May 2013, Springsteen sued in federal court, seeking to be declared "actually innocent" and receive compensation for his wrongful imprisonment – including several years on death row - arguing that he had been "dangling under the sword of Damocles" since the charges against him were dismissed "pending further investigation." Texas Comptroller Susan Combs. whose office administers those compensation funds, had declined to pay Springsteen restitution, saying there had been no official declaration of actual innocence, as state law requires. The federal suit was ultimately dismissed as well - Judge Lee Yeakel agreed with a magistrate who found that the court lacked jurisdiction to consider the claim.

Springsteen has returned to court, this time in state district court in Bexar County. (His pleadings argue that he has no chance of a fair hearing in Travis County.) In December he filed the current suit that seeks, under the civil Declaratory Judgment Act, to have District Judge Solomon J. Casseb III. enter a finding that he is. indeed, innocent.

The suit was not brought as an adversarial action, and Travis County D.A. Lehmberg is not named as a party. However, lawyers for Springsteen, including veteran Austin

attorney Broadus Spivey, have notified her as a "party of interest." In turn Lehmberg, through Assistant D.A. Scott Taliaferro, in January asked the CCA to block the Bexar County court from considering the case: "It is abundantly clear that the issuance of an actual-innocence judgment by the Bexar County court would be an abuse of that court's discretion," Taliaferro wrote. "By issuing such a judgment - which that court clearly has no jurisdiction, authority, or legal basis to issue - that court would, in effect, create a mechanism that would be used by forum-shopping criminal defendants seeking to circumvent the criminaljustice process and preempt the possibility of a guilty verdict in a criminal trial."

Throughout her office's protestations are suggestions that the state may retry Springsteen. "It is true that Springsteen was found guilty of capital murder in the ... criminal trial. However, for the purposes of actual-innocence analysis, his current status is not that of a convicted murderer, but rather that of an uncharged suspect," Taliaferro wrote. Thus, he may be retried, and since there is no statute of limitations

on capital murder, there's no timeline for the state to decide. A second prosecution is not "precluded by the fact that the capitalmurder indictment was dismissed 'pending further investigation,' which suggests, at the very least, the possibility that, upon completion of that investigation, Springsteen will again be prosecuted for the capital murder of Amy Ayers."

In mid-January the CCA refused to intervene, rejected Lehmberg's appeal, and bounced the case back to Casseb's San Antonio court for further consideration and a possible hearing.

Spivey finds absurd the notion that Lehmberg would ever retry Springsteen, given the lack of evidence against him and the existence of the unknown male DNA. "They're not going to try him again," he said. Nevertheless, Lehmberg's position that as a formerly incarcerated individual now not under any criminal charges, Springsteen has no avenue to clear his name - received a supporting brief filed with the CCA by Attorney General Greg Abbott and joined by seven elected district attorneys from El Paso to Harris counties. The prosecutors argued that the suit not only circumvents the criminal process, but is also an inappropriate application of civil statutes.

Spivey counters that the state statute that covers compensation for the wrongfully convicted contemplates that a person might be able to prove themselves innocent, if not through a writ of habeas corpus (which is not available to Springsteen since he is not currently imprisoned) then through some equivalent process, in this case, via a suit to seek declaratory judgment from the civil court. That can occur only if Springsteen can meet his burden of demonstrating he is, indeed, innocent. It may be an uphill battle, but Spivey believes he has right on this side: "The real issue in this thing is real simple," he said. "Is [Springsteen] entitled to a process to determine if he is actually innocent or not?"

A Step in the Right Direction

Sen. Kirk Watson celebrates U.S. District Judge Orlando Garcia's Feb. 26 ruling that Texas' ban on same-sex marriage is unconstitutional. Two same-sex couples - one legally wed out of state and another seeking to tie the knot in Texas - had sought an injunction against the law's enforcement, arguing the ban violated their right to equal protection under the law. "Today's court decision is not made in defiance of the great people of Texas or the Texas Legislature," Garcia said, "But in compliance with the U.S. Constitution and Supreme Court precedent. Without a rational relation to a legitimate governmental purpose, state-imposed inequality can find no refuge in our U.S. Constitution." Although the ruling was a victory for marriage-equality advocates, Garcia conceded that the issue will ultimately be decided by the Supreme Court. The order was stayed pending Attorney General Greg Abbott's appeal to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals. - Brandon Watson







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SXSWedu: Weingarten and Ravitch on Schools

SXSWedu - the education intro to the high festival season - kicked off on Monday, March 3, but American Federation of Teachers President Randi Weingarten got an early start. Prior to her formal panel on the value of community schools, she had a chance to see in action two of the Austin Independent School District's most collaborative campuses. Accompanied by AISD trustees Gina Hinojosa and Lori Moya, Education Austin President Ken Zarifis. and Council Member Mike Martinez, she visited Webb Middle School in North Austin and Travis Heights Elementary in South Austin. Both campuses have been through major changes, but under very different conditions. Last decade, Webb was under a state threat of repurposing before the neighborhood rallied to save its school, while Travis Heights is Austin's first "indistrict" charter.

The AFT has a particular connection to Travis Heights: It was a union grant that provided seed money to enable the community to reshape its campus while remaining in the district. In a series of classroom visits, Weingarten saw the results of that newly won latitude, including new analytic tools in "blended learning," using gamebased computer education to supplement and guide classroom instruction on a childby-child basis. She was particularly impressed by project-based service learning. Fifth graders explained how they had taken a survey of bullying on campus to understand its roots, while second-grade students discussed how, as part of their lessons on conservation, they will carry a bucket of water nearly four miles - a common experience for people in parts of the developing world. The result, Weingarten told the school's Thunderboard parent/ teacher advisory group, was a testament to "the underlying notion of caring and relationship building."

There was much discussion of how to use the Travis Heights model elsewhere in Austin. Weingarten said, "The catchy thing to say is, 'Can vou bottle it?' But you know you can't." Instead, Trustee Hinojosa told her, "It's about how we inspire \(\frac{\tilde{u}}{2} \) parents and teachers at other campuses."

One simple step that could make that easier is changing the name. AISD has a troubled his-

tory with charters - especially in East Austin, where district pupils have been aggressively recruited by private groups and the term "in-district charter" carries some negative connotations. Applauding the Travis Heights commitment, Zarifis said, "I don't care what you call it, let's just start doing it."

Ravitch: Stop the Bandwagon

That sentiment echoed in that afternoon's speech by the community schools movement's leading thinker and researcher, former Assistant Secretary of Education Diane Ravitch. Her talk was a rallying cry for the movement, and left some bruises on education reformers. She was, she acknowledged,

initially a major supporter of initiatives like standardized testing. But, she said, "I got off the bandwagon, and I'm trying to push the bandwagon back."

Her speech was less a pushback than a concerted effort to rip off the wheels. She said, "No Child Left Behind' was a hoax. The 'Texas Miracle' never existed, but you already knew that." She attacked what she called education's "bad news club. ... To listen to them, you'd think we were in a third-world nation, not the greatest, most powerful nation on the planet."

As a former member of the **National Assessment Governing**

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Board, Ravitch was particularly pointed about the worthlessness of standardized tests. Even though the board is supposed to be the last line of review, she regularly saw multiple-choice questions where there were two right answers, or none. She said, "I can give you example after example where, if a

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


child thinks twice, they're lost." Noting that America is "the most overtested nation in the world," she questioned not just the use of testing, but its value as a barometer of student assessment, describing it instead as "a great way to distribute privilege amongst people that already have privilege." Rather than predicting student achievement or potential, she argued, test scores are primarily an indicator of family income and parental education. She concluded, "The scores of 15-year-olds on a standardized test do not predict the future. Period."

Yet the bad news club has used those scores to ram through measures like charter takeovers and "parental trigger" laws, all in the name of "choice." As Ravitch wryly observed, the last time right-wing politicians talked about school choice it was Strom Thurmond and George Wallace defending segregation. Now she sees a new wave of virtual charter companies, such as K12 (owned in part by convicted junk bond dealer Michael Milken), sweeping in to take even more money out of public education, and using inaccurate and worthless student test grades as an excuse. For Ravitch, the challenge is to rebuild the understanding of what education is supposed to do. It's not to get every student scoring all As. "If that happens, then you can make accusations of grade inflation," she said. "The purpose of education is to make good citizens."

Facebook 'Threat' Case Unresolved

Last February 14, **Justin Carter**, then 18 years old, was indicted on a charge of "terroristic threat," a third-degree felony which carries a potential penalty of up to 10 years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000. The "crime"? A Facebook comment.

Carter enjoyed the online video game League of Legends, and often chatted on Facebook with other players. Internet conversations are not the most civil and polite interactions - occasionally marked by obnoxious verbal jabs, rude but essentially meaningless. In February, Carter got into a

verbal exchange with another player, who suggested he was dangerous or crazy. He responded sarcastically, "I'm fucked in the head alright, I think I'ma SHOOT UP A KINDERGARTEN [...] AND WATCH THE BLOOD OF THE INNOCENT RAIN DOWN [...] AND EAT THE BEATING HEART OF ONE OF THEM.'

The comment, made two months after the Sandy Hook school massacre, was screencapped by a Canadian woman who alerted police in Texas. Carter was initially

jailed in Austin, but was moved to Comal County when it was determined that's where he actually lived. According to his pro bono San Antonio attorney, Donald Flanary, the police didn't search his house and his father's house until weeks after the arrest. They found no weapons nor threatening documents, nor anything other than the computer used to make the comments. Jennifer Carter has said that her son has "never had any kind of fascinations with real guns or anything. He didn't even own a pocket knife. The only kind of gun he was ever around were those plastic guns you use in video games," according to James Roberts of local blog the Horn.

Carter's bond was set at a headline-grab-

bing \$500,000; on July 11, 2013, an anonymous donor paid it. Prior to his release, Carter endured harassment and physical abuse from other inmates, and then, reportedly for his own protection, solitary confinement. He's currently living with his grandmother in San Antonio; the conditions of his bond prevent him from living with anyone under the age of 18, even his two siblings. Additionally, he can't be within a thousand feet of any place children may gather, nor can he use the Internet, so he's been unable to find a job.

In a July 3, 2013, press release, Comal County Criminal District Attorney Jennifer Tharp said that most of the county's cases are resolved through plea negotiations. Flanary said, "They've offered things obut unless they are willing to dismiss it, there is no deal." Jennifer Carter, Justin's mother, confirmed that her son has rejected offers of 10 years and eight years in prison. "We don't g believe you should say that you're guilty for some-Thing that you didn't do," ₹ she said. Tharp's press release stated that, in the absence of a plea agree-

ment, Carter's case "will be tried before a jury of twelve Comal County citizens," and that her office has no further comment.

Legally, the case may rest on Carter's actual intentions. Under section 22.07 of the Texas Penal Code, "A person commits an offense if he threatens to commit any offense involving violence to any person or property with intent to: cause impairment or interruption of public communications, public transportation, public water, gas, or power supply or other public service," or to "place the public or a substantial group of the public in fear of serious bodily injury."

Jennifer Carter told me that her son was clearly being sarcastic. "He was not intending to threaten anyone. He was not intending to carry out a threat against a school or children. So, why should he go to jail for that, you know? There's supposed to be free speech in this country. We're supposed to be allowed to say anything we want to, as long it's not a direct threat with serious intent behind it."

Currently, Flanary is working on a writ of habeas corpus denouncing the handling of Carter's case. He says it will include "numerous claims of violations of the First and Fourth and Fifth and Sixth and Eighth Amendment rights." Meanwhile, at press time, no trial date had been announced. "Basically, the hearings have just sort of kept going on and on and on," said Jennifer Carter. "They've piled so many motions I just can't keep track anymore." She and her

family are trying to stay optimistic. "Every hearing, we hope that it's going to be the one where they go, 'The case is dismissed' or 'We're not going to pursue charges.' But it just keeps going on." Another hearing has been set for March 28.

Flanary commented, "Prior to [Carter's] arrest, I was optimistic that [a case like] this wouldn't happen. Then when I got on the case, I was optimistic that, in a matter of days, it would be dismissed, because it's so stupid. Then after months went on, I was optimistic that after they see us fighting and they see all this press - bad press - that they're going say, 'This is just dumb, and we're going to stop.' That didn't happen. So, am I optimistic that the judge will do the right thing? Sure. But the reality is, we are prepared to go to the highest court in the land, and, if we have to, we will."

Can't Lagunitas and other breweries along the river just switch to groundwater? No. The head beermaster at Lagunitas notes that heavy minerals in that water would cause it to fizz in the brewing process; plus there are concentrations of nitrates, iron, and manga-

nese in the area groundwater, creating issues of odor, taste, and other unpleasantries that do not add up to good beer.


What the Lagunitas experience teaches us once again is that all things are linked together, despite the fantasies of industry shills who insist that their contaminates have

no dire consequences. Mess with the global climate and you mess with Lake Mendocino, which messes with the Russian River, which messes with the beer. And now you're messing with me and millions of beer drinkers. Like I said, it's personal.











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


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Fun and Games With Stratfor

APD and DPS collaborated with private 'geopolitical intelligence firm' – including bomb demonstrations and undercover surveillance

One of the murkier and more forbidding aspects of the post-9/11 world has been the massive growth of what's become known as the "intelligence industrial complex." Similar to its sibling, the "military industrial complex" (as it was called by President Dwight Eisenhower), the intelligence industrial complex is a national and international web of numerous partnerships between government and various private corporate entities of all shapes and sizes. In a major 2010 report by The Washington Post on "Top Secret America," investigators summarized, "Some 1,271 government organizations and 1,931 private companies work on programs related to counterterrorism, homeland security and intelligence in about 10,000 locations across the United States." That was four years ago; despite federal budget cuts, this quasi-"defense" economic sector has continued to grow.

Based on the broad figures provided in annual federal budgets, from 2001 to 2012, spending on "homeland security" has quadrupled. During that time, the federal government has persistently outsourced intelligence work, as government employees routinely carry their security clearances into the private sector. (The Post estimated that 854,000 people - or roughly the total population of Austin - held "top-secret" security clearances nationwide as of 2010.) Consider just Booz Allen Hamilton, former employer of National Security Agency whistle-blower Edward Snowden and the company where he accessed the documents he leaked. According to a U.S. General Services listing of government contractors, BAH maintains extensive connections with government agencies and provides a variety of services, including intelligence gathering and analysis, worth in 2012 more than \$4

However, you needn't travel to Hawaii, where Snowden worked, to find examples of overlap between government, law enforcement, and private intelligence. You don't even need to leave Austin.

The Stratfor Hack

On Dec. 24, 2011, activist Jeremy Hammond completed several weeks of work hacking the computer files of Austin-based global intelligence company Strategic Forecasting, Inc., better known as "Stratfor." Soon afterwards, several of the company's emails and many of its subscriber credit card numbers were released on the Internet. By February 2012, the material made it to the website of Wikileaks, which gradually began to release more emails. An early release revealed a connection between Stratfor and the Texas Department of Public Safety, concerning the DPS surveillance of Occupy Austin. (See "Strange Bedfellows," Feb. 3, 2012). Those documents reflect that a Texas DPS agent was

providing undercover intelligence information on Occupy protesters not only to his state agency superiors, but to private firm Stratfor - although neither the company nor the DPS would provide any additional information or comment on the relationship, and DPS claimed at the time that it couldn't verify the existence of any undercover agent.

On Nov. 15, 2013 – the day Hammond was sentenced to 10 years in prison for violat-

ing the Computer Fraud and Abuse Act (and after holding them back during Hammond's trial) – Wikileaks posted on its website the rest of the Stratfor emails. The Wikileaks website now includes posts of more than five million Stratfor emails, dating from July 2004 through December 2011. It's an imposing data file, and has steadily revealed more about the inner workings of the intelligence industrial complex.

Asked by the Chronicle for comment on the additional emails, a Stratfor spokesman referred to the company's standard response, originally attributed to founder and chairman George Friedman: "Some of the emails may be forged or altered to include inaccuracies. Some may be authentic. We will not validate either, nor will we explain the thinking that went into them. Having had our property stolen, we will not be victimized twice by submitting to questioning about them." (See "Stratfor's Web," March 9, 2012.)


On its website, Stratfor describes itself as "a geopolitical intelligence firm that provides strategic analysis and forecasting to individuals and organizations around the world" - in other words, a high-tone foreign policy think tank - and it regularly issues news bulletins and analytical essays to its subscribers. But the hacked emails (which Wikileaks dubbed "The Global Intelligence

> Files") reveal another, much more local aspect of the privately owned company. The emails reflect that Stratfor has cultivated relationships with members of the Austin Police Department and the Texas Department of Public Safety for the purpose of gathering locally based "intelligence" - specifically, surveillance of protest groups - that one would presume (perhaps naively) would not normally be shared beyond


immediate law enforcement circles. In addition to the sharing of confidential information about local activists, the emails also reflect several examples of trainings or demonstrations provided to Stratfor by APD personnel.

For example, throughout August 2011, a number of Stratfor emails discuss an APD demonstration for Stratfor employees using live explosives near Austin-Bergstrom International Airport. In an internal Stratfor email dated Aug. 27, 2011, with the subject line "weekly," Stratfor Vice President Fred Burton announced blissfully: "The highlight of the week was the Austin Police Department (APD) Bomb Squad 'special'













training session for Stratfor staff. A six-man team augmented by the Austin Fire and EMS set off a wide variance of explosive charges for our group, to include ANFO [i.e., ammonium nitrate/fuel oil]. The staff got a chance to feel, smell and touch 'real' explosives; and feel the energy output when bombs are detonated (called a blast wave). The sound and color of the various explosives will enable the team to better understand attack scenes from as they say at Foggy Bottom [i.e., the U.S. State Department] 'dispatches afar.' We also examined the blast seats (craters). Several said it was the best damn training they have ever received at Stratfor. We also had a little bit of fun (or panic) when two brush fires were started. ... Man 'ole man was it fun."

(Burton's personal notions of amusement are already notorious from earlier email releases, as when he speculated on the possibility of the U.S. killing or torturing Wikileaks founder Julian Assange at Guantanamo, and reminisced about the good old days at the State Department when political assassinations were not so controversial. Here's Burton (April 27, 2010), musing nostalgically on Bolivian President Evo Morales and then Venezuelan President Hugo Chávez: "Back in the day, we would have been planning [Morales'] (and Chavez's) helicopter 'accident.' Guess I'm getting old, I think it's best to keep these lads around for comic relief.")

In addition to the oddity of APD blowing things up for the entertainment (or "understanding") of a private company, the brush fires mentioned by Burton (and apparently extinguished by the Austin Fire Department, which was standing by along with EMS) occurred during a countywide burn ban, and the worst year of the current severe drought - indeed, less than two weeks before the great Bastrop County fire. Seemingly oblivious to these conditions, Burton emailed Stratfor employees the day of the demonstration, flippantly warning: "If anyone calls from the arson squad, we were never there. ... Admit nothing, deny

August 27, 2011

[Burton to Strafor staff]

Visited the federal bldg in Houston today to arrange further free training for the lads via the State Department. More on that later.

everything, make counter-accusations. (CIA Bombing School motto)."

But the live explosives demonstration, while undoubtedly "fun" for Burton and his colleagues, was also – according to an email sent before the demonstration to Burton from APD Senior Officer Robert Nunez -"law enforcement sensitive" (the phrase routinely used by APD brass to classify information as confidential). Nunez advised

Burton, "Photos are ok, no video ... we don't like seeing any bomb squad stuff on any social media sites." Asked for comment recently, Cmdr. Nick Wright of APD's Explosive Ordnance Disposal division explained via email, "Live explosive demonstrations are very rare," and contrary to Nunez's earlier warning to Burton, Wright later added that "no law enforcement sensitive information is shared." Nevertheless, Burton was thoroughly pleased with the demonstration, writing to Stratfor employees three days after the demonstration: "The folks are kind enough to cook off whatever we want to see."

Earlier this month, the Chronicle asked APD the purpose of this exercise, and received a response that essentially echoed Burton's internal Stratfor emails. Cmdr. Wright explained, via email: "The explosives demonstration was a familiarization training for Stratfor analysts so they better understand the intel they processed around the globe regarding improvised explosives and their capabilities." Wright added, "The demonstrations are part of the regional explosive awareness training mission performed by the Bomb Squad for various law enforcement and governmental agencies. Stratfor was considered a partner NGO (Non-Governmental Organization) and U.S. Government contractor in the global war on terrorism through its activities in the global intelligence field."

Team Building


The Stratfor emails reflect that watching APD personnel ignite explosives was believed to be of crucial importance to the "analytical" work of Stratfor staffers. According to an internal email dated Aug. 24, 2011, the day of the demonstration, Stratfor employee Sean Noonan informed Burton and others, "I'm hop[ing] all of you that thought this was just for fun and games understand how important this is to us tactical analysts understanding what we are doing."

In another email, Officer Nunez provided Burton with a list of six APD officers, including himself, who attended the demonstration, adding "We appreciate the cooperation and open communications." It's unclear why Stratfor would need a list of APD officers who were present, but another Stratfor email offers at least one hint - the eagerness of APD personnel to take part in the theatrics and perhaps, eventually, to have an opportunity to join the Stratfor "team," in the long-standing tradition of mutual interests between uniformed police forces and private security firms.

According to an Oct. 2, 2011, email, Stratfor employee Jen Richmond wrote Burton: "James Stanesic - the detective that has helped me out so much - texted me today and said he heard a rumor that we were collaborating with the APD. I told him that we were but that I didn't know the specific details. He said: 'I want in.' You know I can't recommend him enough, so whatever we are doing, I highly suggest him being on the 'team.' He's one of the best cops I've met."

Intel 'R' Us

And this "collaborating" and "cooperation" extended beyond explosives and beyond APD. Numerous emails reflect the sharing with Stratfor of undercover information on local activist groups.

For example, an email dated Dec. 5, 2011, sent from APD officer J.J. Schmidt was forwarded to Burton by APD Lt. Tom Sweeney: it contains information about an Occupy Austin march to Chase Bank at 221 W. Sixth that took place on Dec. 8, 2011. Schmidt's email contained APD's confidentiality notice; despite that warning, Burton was told, "It is unclear how many people will be in attendance. It appears that the bank is the target of the protest, however, there are a few other offices of concern at this location." However, Sweeney added, "[w]e don't expect trouble." One possible "office of concern" would be that of Stratfor itself, also located in the Chase Bank office building. In another internal email regarding a different march, Burton shares similar information that came "from an LE [Law Enforcement] intel source."

When asked about APD's policy regarding informing businesses about the activities of protesters, Wright responded (somewhat at cross-purposes), "APD does not have [a] policy [of] informing businesses when protesters are expected. However, if there is a public threat to a business then it is the Austin Police Department's duty and obligation to let the businesses know."

APD was not Stratfor's only source for information on activists. According to a Dec. 14, 2011, email, DPS Agent David Dudley provided Burton with "research" on Occupy Austin, environmental activist group Deep Green Resistance, and local organizers LoveATX, whose website lists their goals as "develop holistic culture" and "unite for progress." Dudley wrote ominously to Burton that LoveATX "has a website that seems all warm and fluffy, but ..." He includes a twoand-half-page research document by an unnamed author (possibly Dudley himself), titled: "Deep Green Resistance' Joins Forces

with 'Occupy Well Street." "Occupy Well Street" was the name given by Occupy to activism concerning natural gas "fracking," and the document mainly recounts antifracking protest actions.

After numerous requests, DPS would not comment on Dudley's activities nor his relationship with Stratfor. A spokesman would only confirm that "David Dudley is a Criminal Investigations Division agent stationed in Austin."

One person mentioned in the Dudley email is Occupy Austin participant and 2012 City Council candidate John Duffy, who told the Chronicle via email, "Seeing your phone number in [APD] documents is a bit worrisome, because it makes you wonder if they are listening to your calls. ... It just seemed so disproportionate to what Occupy was doing."

Punching Stratfor's Ticket

The dubious relationships among Stratfor, APD, and DPS remain unexplained to this date, and none of the parties are eager to discuss the subject. APD describes the bomb demonstration as "an attempt [by APD] to stay well informed," but the department also confirmed that "there are no legal contracts, agreements that document this relationship" with Stratfor - unlike a direct government contractor that might at least be bound by contract terms.

DPS had even less to say, and in the absence of more information - unlikely to be forthcoming - it remains unknown how Stratfor came to receive the access it has to the state law enforcement agency. Equally troubling, it's also unclear under what legal authority a now acknowledged DPS agent was providing undercover intelligence directly to Stratfor.

Stratfor VP Burton's own brief stint at the DPS, in 2009, as Assistant Director for Intelligence & Counterterrorism, likely played a role in establishing Stratfor's network. According to Burton's "weekly" email about the live explosives demonstration, "You simply can't pay (nor get in) this

kinda training without having the right tickets punched."

In that context, Burton was apparently not shy about returning agency favors, as suggested by law enforcement personnel clamoring to join his "team." He's also listed on the board of directors of the Greater Austin Crime Commission, an organization of mostly local businessmen and a few public officials devoted to "public safety." In that capacity, he reports in an Oct. 2, 2011, Stratfor email string that he met with the ACC in "executive session" (presumably the executive committee of the board), after he was asked "to help with a councilman trying to reduce police head count. ... I was asked to help articulate why the police should not reduce their manpower."

Council Member Bill Spelman, also of UT's LBJ School of Public Affairs and an expert on modern police staffing, will no doubt be amused to discover that his perennially quixotic efforts at City Hall to bring rational limits to the public safety budget were the subject of such high-level strategizing at the Crime Commission. As for Stratfor, in the wake of these emails, it's easy to guess at least one reason why one-time Maryland cop Burton would want to ensure a steady supply of Austin police officers: more undercover intelligence for the company, and more potential recruits for the "team."

BigBoy's 'Slap Noir'

My trademark warning to anyone who hands me their hard-wrought manuscript: "Are you sure you want me to read this? 'Cause I never fuck around about writing."

For instance, in Los Angeles, during the years we partnered as screenwriters, Mr. James BigBoy Medlin wrote a solo script, a pet project of his own. We met to discuss it at a Pico Boulevard eatery near 20th Century Fox, a studio where, together, we'd endured assorted unpleasantnesses and a bit of excitement. My entire critique of Mr. Medlin's script went like this: "Every good writer will one day write something that stinks. You don't have to worry anymore, 'cause you just wrote yours.

So Mr. Medlin knew what he was getting into about three years ago when he sent me a novel. He knew I'd tell him what's what, no matter what. I'm not that way about everything, but emphatically that way about writing.

(And I don't usually call him Mr. Medlin. I call him Big, or Biggie, or Your Bigness, and even, on occasion, James, but this is official business, as you'll see, so tonight he's mostly Mr. Medlin.)

He sent me a thick manuscript. I loved the title - Slap Noir - and was terrified to read it. First, because the title announced that he attempted a story that was genuinely noir and also genuinely slapstick, and a writer has to be nuts to try that. Second, well – *Slap Noir* is a novel. See, it's nothing to write a bad screenplay. Every screenwriter writes a few turkeys. Two, three, four months' work down the tubes - have a few drinks and to hell with it. But a novel? A novel as long as Big's manuscript? That's two to four years' effort. I know what it is to put a few years into a book and come up empty. For the next couple of years you walk around like you've been mugged - and you're the one who mugged you.

Every first draft needs fixing; that's to be expected. And Mr. Medlin has been a pro as long as I have. He knows his trade, so I anticipated something not bad and probably good. But, with a novel, just good isn't good enough. A novelist who's for real wants something special.

Something special is what I read. Slap *Noir* is like only itself.

Slap Noir is a mystery - and not. You care about who-done-it at first, but that's not the

point of the story until the end, when suddenly you care again and care very much. (And I, personally, didn't know who-done-it until Mr. Medlin wanted me to know.)

Slap Noir is a comedy - and not. You literally laugh out loud over and over, but the final effect is, just as literally, chilling.

Slap Noir takes no sides - you might say it's morally disorientating. You see the most heinous people through their own eyes, and, of course, in their own eyes they shine. No one is all good, no one is all bad, everyone is serious, everyone is funny, everyone knows something, nobody knows it all, and there are no heroes. Just people - people in a mid-Sixties West Texas oil town called Achilles, caught in a swirl of chaos that is no one's and everyone's fault.

And then there's Mr. Medlin's style. Verbally and structurally, he paints this complex landscape with no straight lines. Sometimes you don't know the subject of a sentence until you get to its end – and that's quite a trick; I like to think my technique is pretty fine, but I can't do that. Mr. Medlin often employs the passive voice - a great taboo in contemporary writing; the effect is an indirectness that can be very funny and/ or cagey: A grizzled West Texas bullshitter who'll tell all there is to tell but wants to make vou wonder.

In short, I loved Slap Noir for how it jauntily defies all categories and is purely an expression of James BigBoy Medlin's comedic, existential spectrum of compassion

on the one end, horror on the other, and, in between, the longing look of a great clown - the look that says, "How can this all go on? And how can it not?"

Anyway, Slap Noir changed my life in a most concrete fashion. I suddenly envisioned a press - an imprint, as it used to be called - to pub-**VENTURA** lish works that are too funky for the bourgeois, too intellectual for the pulpy, too impolitic for the academic, too pulpy for the literary, too ornery for the Manhattan crowd and too dust-devilish for the Los Angeles crowd - with room for works that are too superbly quiet for this pointlessly noisy society. We call it LettersAt3amPress: e-books, print-ondemand, and whatever else we can pay for after rent, grub, cable, and whiskey. Slap Noir would be our first book. I wanted to personally publish Big's novel.

Employing his favorite line in all of cinema, from Sam Peckinpah's The Wild Bunch, Mr. Medlin said: "Why not?"

At LettersAt3amPress, we - Jazmin Aminian and I – do not pay ourselves or take any profits. This press is a calling, not a business. Wages and profits, or a lack of profits, inevitably would make this a business and there goes all the fun. Every penny earned by our books, minus what's owed to vendors, goes directly to our authors.

To feel a calling is a beautiful thing. Like you're in the right place, at the right time, doing what's good for you to do. Wages a'plenty. I'd say.

What luxury: Given that I don't profit, I can praise Slap Noir to the skies with impunity and integrity while letting you know that as of today Slap Noir is available on Kobo, Nook, iBook, and Amazon - and it looks really cool. For the future, LettersAt3amPress has five more authors in the pipeline so far: Karen Holden, Jo Carol Pierce, Guy Juke, Mark Fairfield, and myself - with more on the way. We're serious. Stay tuned.

Back to the central subject at hand:

Slap Noir's Achilles, Texas, is, by some uncanny coincidence, very like Odessa, Texas - the town where Mr. Medlin was raised. Recently, I drove through Odessa for the first time.

Let me testify: I've driven from Waterville. Maine, to Tijuana, Mexico; from Key West, Fla., to Bellingham, Wash.; from Ruidosa, Texas, to Butte, Mont. - and many a town in between. But I have never seen any burg as bleak as Odessa. Ninety-nine thousand souls and the only structure of any size is a bank. Drive a highway overpass and all you'll see is miles and miles of scrubby desert dotted with oil wells.

Emailed to Big that night: "You have my profoundest and everlasting sympathies. I write you from Marfa, where I drove to meet up with Steve Erickson. ... US 385 turned into Andrews Highway turned into a street that began with a G and went right

through Odessa ... and I thought: This town makes Lubbock

> look like Santa Monica." Big replied: "Now you been to Texas, boy. Marfa got them spooky lights. Odessa got sumthin' scarier ... sumthin' born of church, baptized in a honky-tonk, and escaped from a fossil fuel pit of misconceptions. Did you see the thick, dark cloud over Odessa? Smell the sweet

stench of rotten eggs and misguided good deeds? Did you see the wide roads running in both directions? Grant Avenue, gateway to redneck minimalism."

Yet, you'll find in Slap Noir that Mr. Medlin loves that forbidding town. He gives the place full credit for shaping who he is, and he almost mournfully recognizes that he could not have become what he is had he stayed. When he makes fun, it's never with scorn and never superiorly. He makes fun because it's funny and it's crazy and it's sad that humans would set up shop as bleakly as they have in Odessa or anywhere.

Only a writer with Mr. Medlin's skills and Mr. Medlin's heart could find in that desolation the frailty, funniness, sweetness, obtuseness, and scariness that makes the human being the damnedest creature on this planet.

PLAYING A COZY VENUE AT SXSW WON'T BE THIS COMEDY LEGEND'S FIRST ENCOUNTER WITH ADVERSE CONDITIONS

Bill Cosby roots around your words - feeling, searching for that seed. Something to bite off, riff on, spark an anecdote. With SXSW Comedy having snagged the household-name humorist, there was only one real question for the 76-year-old storyteller. We'd spoken twice before and met his last time through Bass Concert Hall. For the complete interview, visit austinchronicle.com. - Raoul Hernandez

Austin Chronicle: So ... South by Southwest. Do you even know what that is?

Bill Cosby: No. AC: [Laughs]

BC: I do know that the comedians working this are the younger and newer ones, okay? I know that if they were gunfighters, they would enter town shooting already, right? [chuckles] AC: I'm wondering -

BC: No! You gotta clear up for me: What is it that you thought? It excited me when you said, "Do you know what you're getting into?" AC: [Laughs] So it's this conference that has three heads: Music, Film, and Interactive. They run one right after the other. Musically, it's over 2,000 bands playing in 100 clubs, five sets a night. There are literally people from all over the world here, and our Downtown is tiny, and suddenly you've got tens of thousands of people everywhere – in every restaurant, theatre. everywhere you can imagine. It's the circus -

BC: Yes, yes! Okay, now put me onstage. "And now, ladies and gentlemen ..." What stage am I on?

AC: You're playing a venue of 300 people!

AC: Three hundred people. You're used to playing


Atlantic City and Vegas and Bass Concert Hall!

BC: No, no! I'm also ... Raoul, I've also played the Gaslight Coffee House at 3am with seven people. And only two of them were together. Three hundred? I think you're gonna love what you see. Tell me something else you're thinking about, go ahead.

AC: The incongruity for me is the venue. It's a funky little shack. A hip shack, don't get me wrong, but not only is it going to be packed for you, there'll be all the people trying to get in that can't, so -

BC: Okay, stop - stop. Raoul, I'm gonna run a range of difficulty. Let's go on a cruise ship. I'm gonna do 55 minutes, and the ship is starting to roll [chuckles]. And ... it's not a good feeling.

Okay, let's go to a place that booked me and the sound system sounds like I'm in a stainless steel-and-tin Quonset hut and I can't get rid of the bouncing echoes or hear



the laughter, and people are having a tough time understanding what I'm saying. Okay? I've done that.

I've been in situations. I've done weddings, where everybody ...

Oh, okay. Here it is: New Year's Eve. Ask me how long ago was the last time I did New Year's Eve. Forty-nine years ago. Why? Because therein lies the worst concentration blocker I have ever played. It was Harrah's. And they had a huge clock, Raoul, that was

six feet in diameter. Now we're going to count off to midnight. People paid pretty good money in those days, maybe \$50 a head, and that's "Wow," 'cause it's Reno. So I come out and I'm gonna make them laugh. You know me, I sit down, and these people have started to medicate themselves early. It's 9 o'clock. They've already set out the party thing. I come out and sit down, and I'm like, "Fat Albert!"

[Makes noise like a New Year's party favor.] Somebody in the back with one of those things you shake. [Makes noise again.] "Hey, hold the thing." And I look down, and one of the early medicated people has one of those paper things which you blow and the paper unrolls, then comes back. And he's doing that to the front of my shoe. And I'm looking at this. [Laughs] These people in the audience are waiting for me to talk about Fat Albert or something.

So the guy's hitting the tip of my shoe with the blower. Then I hear: [Makes the noise again]. At five after nine, a man's voice says. "What time is it?" [Laughs] I said, "Sir, just for you, we've placed a clock here." So I guess it's his wife who says, "It's five after nine." He says, "Oh." So I fought with stomach-muscle tightening all the way. I didn't know what to do. I really did not know what to do. I knew there were people who came to see me, but every time I made a move ... [Makes the noise.] "What time is it?" I think I came off at 11 o'clock. Oh my goodness. I went downstairs, and that room, which is the comedy room of life, had turned into a stomach-muscle-cramping-tightening [horror], and I said to the entertainment directors, "That's it for me and New Year's. I don't know how to do it I don't have an act for this "

I think that's the greatest example of adversity. I canceled all New Year's after that.

'FOUND: Photographs of the Rolling Stones'

THE DEN SHOWS LOST IMAGES OF THE WORLD'S GREATEST ROCK & ROLL BAND WHEN IT WAS STILL A BUNCHA YOUNG PUNKS

Rare photographs of the Rolling Stones are on view in Austin - snapshots showing a relaxed and casual group of young men enjoying the early stages of superstardom. The 23 small-format photos, taken during the band's 1965

American tour, depict all of the original Stones - Mick Jagger, Keith Richards, Brian Jones, Charlie Watts, Bill Wyman, and founding member and road manager Ian Stewart - taking in the motel environs of Savannah, Ga., and Clearwater, Fla.

The youth of these six young men jumps out of each frame. Mick looks like a sunglasses model, and several images feature members of the band looking directing into the camera, breaking down the fourth wall in a

powerful way. Most were taken poolside, which offers a chilling image of Brian Jones. With a large motel sign in the background, Jones does a handstand in preparation for a jump into the pool. Four years later, he would be found dead at

home, drowned in his own pool - a dark backstory for a bright, shiny image.

The story behind these photographs is as interesting as the pictures themselves. They were discovered in a flea market in

southern California by Lauren White, a musician, and her father. A dealer called her over to his stand to look at them. He clearly didn't know what he had, White told Cool Hunting's Vivianne Lapointe in an interview, but she admits that she didn't either. It was only after doing research that she came to believe that the images hadn't been published or seen by many people since they were taken.

Working with George Augusto of Los Angeles' Dilettante Gallery, White contacted Allison Gorsuch and Taylor Livingston


of Apart Productions, an art project management firm, to advise them. After reviewing the photos, they decided to create a gallery showcase of the images. With the negatives unavailable, the prints were taken to a professional lab to be scanned

and enlarged. The enlarged format allows the viewer to bask in fame not yet solidified into caricature. The colors are muted in the way one would expect for photographs a half-century old. The palette lends an authenticity, connecting the group with the time. "FOUND" debuted at Dilettante in 2012.

The photographs made their way to Austin through Livingston, who's both the director of the Hopper Art Trust, managing the late Dennis Hopper's artwork, and the curatorial director of the DEN, a real estate office cum art gallery on the ground floor of Austin's W Hotel. After setting up their real-estate studio in the northwest corner of the W block, coowners Bryan Cady and Will Steakley decided to take advantage of the large walls and open two-story structure to bring art into the mix. The DEN's first exhibition showcased artwork by Joe Ely and his daughter Marie. "FOUND" is just the venue's second show. While there is no gallery receptionist to greet visitors, all are welcome to walk in and enjoy the work.

Just as the provenance of the photos is unclear, so too is the photographer. The Stones have seen the pictures and even used a couple for a tour slideshow, but no one can say who took them. Because he appears in only one of the photographs, Keith Richards is the best guess for the mystery snapper. But considering how much has happened since 1965 – especially for this hard-living group – the mystery may never be solved. "FOUND" lets us see the band before all that hard living went down. - Rod Machen

The star of TBS' 'The Pete Holmes Show' is a poster boy for SXSW Comedy's impact on a comic's career

It wasn't long ago that the local comedy landscape scraped by without the embarrassment of riches it enjoys today. But with the emergence of SXSW Comedy in 2008 and the Moontower Comedy Festival in 2012, not to mention last August's kickoff of Funny or Die's Oddball Comedy & Curiosity Festival from the Austin360 Amphitheater, the capital city has been a magnet for the hottest names in comedy for seven years strong.

Of all the comics who've made numerous visits in that time frame, few have fooled around with Austin more than Pete Holmes.

If you're counting along at home, the versatile 34-year-old comedian, podcaster, latenight talk-show host, and all-around silly goose returns for his fourth communion with SXSW Comedy when the Festival rolls out on March 8. This outing takes place in the not-too-distant wake of his Moontower appearances last April and the taping of his hourlong Comedy Central special, Nice Try, the Devil, at ACL Live in October 2012.

In the time since the 2011 release of his debut comedy album, Impregnated With Wonder, Holmes' stock in the adversarial worlds of mainstream and alternative comedy has skyrocketed. As a testament to his continuously expanding crossover appeal, Holmes acquired a seat at the late-night table in October 2013 with TBS' The Pete Holmes Show, an offbeat half-hour of standup, sketch, interviews, and more co-produced by his predecessor on the network's late-night dial, Conan O'Brien.

Holmes' popular weekly podcast, the light and colloquial You Made It Weird - so

named for its host's proclivity for the overshare - keeps thriving in a period of the podcast age where supply runs circles around demand.

With so much on his plate, Holmes aims to cover all his bases on Texas soil during the coming frenzy, including a confirmed stand-up set at the Comedy Gives Back event at Brazos Hall on Sunday, March 9.

"There's the Pete Holmes Show panel which is gonna be great," Holmes says. "I'm really looking forward to the live podcast as well. I just haven't done a live podcast in so long and it's one of my favorite things to do; and Austin is such a great place to do it. That's why I wanted to do my special there,

and it's where we did our first live podcast. So it's been the home of some really great stand-up and podcast memories."

From a fan's perspective, Holmes is the rarest of breeds. Whatever demons he may harbor are kept extremely well-hidden. Perhaps his ability or preference to smother them has something to do with that "weird Christian college" he attended in his native Massachusetts. Fittingly, the smiley, big lug who stands 6-foot-6 gives off the hokey, neon-white look of an undyingly chipper, acoustic guitar-pickin' "youth pastor."

His irreverent, upbeat stand-up and infectiously good-natured temperament put him at odds with the oftentimes arrogant, brooding, and volatile character that drives so much alternative comedy. Weighty personal fiascos like his now 6-year-old divorce from an adulterous ex-wife don't inflame the man who endearingly nicknames himself "Old Petey Pants": Instead "O.P.P." excels at converting seriousness into silliness, as though any overt display of negativity or animus would be a cardinal sin.

So how did Holmes - a friendly, happygo-lucky goofball with little to no evident fronts - get mixed up with and eventually embraced by alt-comics and fans alike? His three fruitful stints performing in the alternative milieu of SXSW Comedy in 2010, 2011, and 2012 certainly had a hand in it.

This year, he accompanies mega-stars Bill Cosby, Fred Armisen, Seth Meyers, and others as a marquee name on the 2014 slate; but he was a mere up-and-comer just four years ago at SXSW 2010.

"I remember that year very, very well," Holmes says. "I remember being pretty overwhelmed, as I was any time I did a festival. But South by Southwest was certainly one of the first I ever did. And it's such a cool thing: I remember it being

intimidating, because you don't feel like you're a cool person or a hot act or anything; so you really feel like you have to earn it. And, to be honest, as I was just considering which live shows I'll be doing, I still feel that way."

When The Pete Holmes Show debuted from Burbank last October, it became the first of the television season's three new-oroverhauled late-night talk shows to hit the air - getting nearly a four-month head start in building viewership over The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon and Late Night With Seth Meyers. Its second season debuted on Feb. 24 and is scheduled for a 13-week run into mid-May. With a young show to continuously calibrate and survival at stake in the brave new world of late-night comedy, you'd think now would be an inopportune time to escape from L.A.

But then again, Pete Holmes and Austin have a good thing going together.

"I think the idea is, the TV show is so much of what I'm into anyway, and South by Southwest is something I've done for several years, so we're just trying to capture the stuff that I enjoy and we're gonna be filming a lot for the show," Holmes says.

"We can't afford to take a trip somewhere and not be filming stuff for the show - it just wouldn't make sense even if it is a really good opportunity. So we're gonna be taping a live podcast for purposes of the TV show. We're gonna be trying to do some sitdown interviews with friends. We're trying to get Robert Rodriguez and some of the musical acts to sit down with us and do an interview or do something fun together. When I think of South by, I think of food trucks and shows that are close to each other and great friends having a good time. So we're really using it as an opportunity just like the fans do - to go and see a lot of

If you do the math on the seventh edition of SXSW Comedy - full schedule at www.sxsw.com/comedy - you'll count 33 official events, three official parties, and 60-plus performers squeezed into its eight days, March 8-15.



The Liar

Maybe George Washington couldn't tell a lie, but if the production of David Ives' The Liar currently strutting its stuff at Highland Mall is any indication, Austin Playhouse sure can. Okay, that didn't sound quite

right. Backing up a bit: Ives didn't actually write The Liar at least originally; in fact, it was written more than 350 years ago, long before our first president and that, ahem, cherry tree incident. But Ives, who is perhaps best known for his witty wordplay in works such as All in the Timing and Venus in Fur, was in many ways the ideal contemporary playwright to adapt Pierre Corneille's script about a compulsive - and proud - spinner of deceit. In terms of style, think Shakespearean comedy: Mistaken identities form the central plot, farcical flouncing abounds, and visual antics keep the action moving along at a quick pace.

But if you're not into all those "thees" and "thous," feare (ye) not: Ives' adaptation is fresh and up to date, smartly intermingling today's parlance with some of those Elizabethanisms that will ring familiare to the eare. The text even goes so far as to include some naughty (modern) language, meaning that what might otherwise be a family-friendly show with an enjoyment factor for even younger audience members is probably best suited to a teenage-and-older constituency.

As the title character, Benjamin Summers is hardly recognizable from the kinds of

roles I've seen him play. He makes a total transformation into the over-the-top, brightlyclad deceiver Dorante, accompanied by loyal servant Cliton (the hilarious J. Ben Wolfe). As Clarice and Lucrece (mistaken in identity), Hildreth England and Lara Toner, respectively. are as affably cartoony as Summers, Wolfe, and their fellow castmates. Of special note is Claire Grasso, who plays night-and-day twins (Shakespeare, anyone?) Isabelle and Sabine with especially comedic flair.

The physical world of Ives' play is set in bright colors by the Playhouse, with design power team Patrick and Holly Crowley providing a highly illustrated set that's matched in Buffy Manners' excellent costumes. Lighting designer Don Day illuminates these colorful goings-on with ample amperage. Director Don Toner has done a fine job with this production, uniting its elements thematically in such a way that gives heightened dimension to an already heightened farce.

I highly recommend that you gather a cadre of groundlings and head to Austin Playhouse for a rousing good time. You won't be disappointed - and I ain't lyin'. - Adam Roberts

Menuhin Competition 2014 Closing Concert Dell Hall at the Long Center, 701 W. Riverside March 2

If the Menuhin Competition is like the Olympics for the violin, then the Gala Concert with the Cleveland Orchestra on Sunday provided all the fireworks of the closing ceremony.

Under the baton of the energizing Giancarlo Guerrero, the orchestra's rendition of Antonin Dvorák's sparkling Carnival Overture heralded the three violinists of the first half. First came Junior First Prize Winner Rennosuke Fukuda playing Fritz Kreisler's Praeludium and Allegro. The 14-year-old from Japan began with full and resonant bowstrokes, filling Dell Hall with his beaming, rich sound. The sensitivity that he displayed in the connections between notes kept the listener leaning in to follow the sinuous phrases and made it easy to forget his young age.

Next was the Senior Division winner. Stephen Waarts, age 17. Performing the first movement of Sergei Prokofiev's Concerto No. 2 in G Minor. Waarts was in the zone. He climbed the mountains of tension in the score with strong psychological intensity.

As incredible as these two young violinists were, though, there was a palpable leap in caliber when Arabella Steinbacher, a competition juror, performed Maurice Ravel's Tzigane. From the first phrase she

played, it was clear that we were in the major leagues - the main difference being that this seasoned professional was willing to let loose. She pushed the boundaries of her technique, sometimes exploiting the gritty sounds that students, working on refining their skills, are less likely to explore. It takes experience, in the practice room and on the stage, to develop enough vulnerability to take technique to the limit. She wasn't afraid to drive the bus, either; she took an active role in directing the orchestra's dynamic tempo changes, which transformed what is often presented as a flashy showpiece into an evocative and poetic celebration of timbral possibilities. Her gutsy and brilliant performance was, in a word, inspiring.

For the program's second half, the orchestra brought Pyotr Tchaikovsky's Fifth Symphony to passionate life, from its despairingly dark opening to its unabashedly triumphant finale. One of the most riveting moments was the clarinet's almost inaudible release at the end of the second movement. The hall was filled with the weight of this magical silence.

I was struck by how many times during the concert I thought, "Wow, what great __," filling in the blank with oft-neglected auxiliary instruments: bass trombone, piccolo, violas, tambourine. With such an all-star team, the orchestra adds up to something greater than the sum of its parts. When an orchestra functions as an organism, it moves and breathes together in a beautiful way that is both rare and exhilarating.

Even though the Cleveland Orchestra doesn't come to Austin every day, the receptive audience signaled an intense craving for world-class artistry. Each hair-raising performance was followed by a big standing ovation. Austin is growing and maturing, and as it does, it wants more great art. I was heartened to see such an enthusiastic reception for an out-of-town orchestra at an international event, and the conductor appeared to be, too. - Natalie Zeldin



Charles Long: 'CATALIN' and 'Pet Sounds' The Contemporary Austin at the Jones Center, 700 Congress, at Laguna Gloria, 3509 W. 35th www.thecontemporaryaustin.org **Through March 15**

If, in walking through CATALIN at the Contemporary Austin's Jones Center, you get the feeling that Charles Long is having 10

conversations at once, that's because he is. The artist's practice, which draws heavily on collaborations of all stripes (designers, musicians, architects, perfumiers), is both his great strength and his weakness. Strength because collaborations allow Long to build sensorily immersive, many-tentacled installations that have the capacity to awe and overwhelm; weakness because some of the critical moves that the artist and his collaborators attempt fall flat, getting lost in the white noise of the installation. For example, downstairs in the Congress Avenue space, a septet of 3-D printed sculptures formally resembling architectural models of icebergs, house a corresponding number of custom-made fragrances. The icebergs' craggy forms are the result of curated data sets, which, if curated more thoughtfully, could deliver scalpel-sharp critique without losing any of their humor. The concatenation of quinoa import/export tonnage, Blackberry stock prices, the street value of

crack, and the median Hollywood fantasy movie budget yields a great title (Investors Bullish on Fantasy Quinoa Despite Lackluster Crackberry Performance), but little in the way of real insight.

The exhibition gets its name from a plastic compound developed in the early 20th century and scrapped because of its toxicity (formaldehyde was an ingredient), and the material takes a star turn upstairs in Long's inspired total-installation. A small yellowing bar of the stuff is loaded into a harpoon-like contraption (ships and portholes are a recurring motif), the purpose of which, it seems, is to gently grate the plastic as though it were Parmesan instead of a carcinogen. Centered in front of a mushroom-topped mihrab made of repurposed agri-waste, Long's meditation on the meanings of material is stunning in places such as these.

Much more playful, focused, and - I needn't hazard a guess - populist are the candy-colored outdoor sculptures that comprise the second half of the Contemporary's Charles Long-a-thon down at the Laguna Gloria campus. Looking like overscaled spleens and tumors on holiday - lounging lubriciously on picnic tables and plopped majestically in the woods - Long's Pet Sounds was initially installed in the Madison Square Park Conservancy in 2012. Here, they link Liam Gillick's recent social sculpture and Marianne Vitale's totemic railroad ties (go a little further and treat yourself to a quiet and strange Nancy Holt sculpture that no one ever talks about). When touched and caressed hugged, even! - the sculptures emit strange loops of sound mostly at odds with the serene Beach Boys melodies referenced in Long's title. Like the Gillick and Vitale, the Contemporary has the opportunity to purchase this gaggle of sound-sculptures, and as long as upkeep and conservation aren't too prohibitive, judging from the response of children and adults alike, it would be wise to - Andy Campbell do so.



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Oscar Beige

One should never look to Oscar fashion for thrills, but in a six-hour stretch of programming where the biggest controversy was a woman tripping for the second time ever, there wasn't much else to talk about. Even the best fashion was rather tame: Jennifer Lawrence held it together in crisp red Dior and frosty blond that brought to mind a latter-day Princess Di;

Emma Watson continued to channel a 40-year-old French woman in Vera Wang; and without HD, you could have mistaken Lady Gaga for Scarlett Johansson. (ScarJo herself

was not present, fueling rumors that she was in fact replaced by an OS shortly after The Nanny Diaries.) Even the uncontested ruler of the red carpet, Lupita Nyong'o, pwned in a petal-blue Prada that would have sent me to sleep if Gwyneth had worn it. Cate Blanchett's beige Armani looked like it was crying sparkly tears of boredom all over itself.

I don't mean to make an example of Cate, even though her gown looked like something Angelina Jolie molted before breakfast. But can we talk about "nude"? First of all, it's very revealing that we still insist on calling it that, when Lupita and Viola Davis and Kerry

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
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


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BEHIND THE SCENES AT RODEO AUSTIN'S ANNUAL BBO COOK-OFF

For tens of thousands of people, the South by Southwest Interactive, Film, and Music Conference and its Downtown environs define the known universe for a couple of weeks every March. During the same time period, however, an alternative universe exists at the Travis County Expo Center (7311 Decker), where the two-week

Rodeo Austin entertainment extravaganza plays to big crowds of its own. Although there's lots of volunteer labor involved in putting on both events and usually some overlap in musical bookings (the Peterson Brothers this year), the two events cover pretty different territory. Rodeo Austin features the fourth largest indoor professional rodeo in the country, animal shows and sales for 4-H kids, mutton-busting for little would-be rodeo-riders, a mighty carnival midway, and a weekend of amateur barbecue competition, all of it dedicated

to preserving Western heritage and raising college money for Rodeo Austin scholars. One area where my own interests merge with Rodeo Austin is barbecue, so last year Kenny Pailes and I wrangled ourselves an invitation to judge at the cook-off, and went to check it out.

Rodeo Austin BBQ Cook-off committee chairman Shayne Lockhart and volunteer coordinator Wanda Hawkins greeted us warmly and gave

us the rundown on the strict rules of the competition. Cooking teams can enter brisket, pork ribs, chicken, beans, Bloody Marys, and/or a jackpot dish (usually game or seafood, sometimes chili or gumbo). Before cooking begins, teams must present their meat to the meat inspector, who verifies that it hasn't been brined, marinated, rubbed, or injected with any flavor enhancements. Once the meat qualifies, cooking teams are given a strict schedule for when each dish has to be delivered to the judges, which establishes the parameters of their cooking time. For example, we were judging pork ribs, which had to be turned in at 1pm, which means they'd been prepping and cooking most of the morning.

In addition to preparing dishes for competition, each team agrees to cook at least 50 pounds of meat to serve the public from their hospitality booth. Some of the booths are simple and rustic, with only a portable barbecue pit and a couple of folding tables. Others are grand, tented affairs with fully equipped kitchens, attractive hostesses, raffles, and tables and chairs, plus stages and sound systems offering live music. Each booth has a donation bucket, and cook-off guests are encouraged to make donations for drinks and food samples. Many of the teams are made up of friends who have competed for years. They spend months soliciting sponsorships in the range of \$20- \$40,000 for every aspect of their booth and then compete seriously for the bragging rights associated with winning barbecue awards as well as having the best hospitality and highest donations. Trophies are awarded, and the prize money for the barbecue competition comes from the entry fees paid by each team. We were told teams often return the winnings as donations.

We judges were sequestered in a tent with tables containing forks, napkins, water, saltine crackers, sticks of celery and carrots, and cheese cubes; everything needed to keep our hands clean and our palates refreshed between boxes of ribs. Judging forms were distributed, and we were instructed to give numerical scores for taste and

appearance. Just before 1pm, the chief cooks of each team queued up outside with plain Styrofoam clamshell boxes full of pork ribs without any sauce or garnish. Each entry was assigned a number corresponding to the team, and then Wanda's volunteer crew began delivering boxes to the judging tables. We sampled more than 20 boxes of ribs that day, and while a couple were tough and chewy and a

couple more dry and charred, by and large they were pretty respectable specimens, with one or two real stand-outs. After the first 12 to 15 boxes, however, some of the finer points got lost and everything just tasted like smoke. It was fun and educational to see such a wellrun operation in the works, but this year I volunteered to judge the jackpot category, hoping for more variety. - Virginia B. Wood

Late Night With Seth Meyers will be joined by a pop-up food truck operated by New York's Shake Shack, promoting the famous brand's arrival at the Lamar Union development later this year and a second outlet at the Domain in 2015. Los Angeles chef Roy Choi will be in town as part of the cast of Jon Favreau's film **Chef**, the festival's opening night film. And former Gourmet magazine editor Ruth Reichl has been soliciting Austin dining suggestions from her Twitter followers; she's coming to town for the screening of her son Nick Singer's feature, Other Months, during SXSW Film. Rumor has it some bigname barbecue chefs will be checking out our smokin' hot barbecue scene during the fortnight, as well. We'll keep you posted.

When the James Beard Foundation announces the finalists for the chef awards every spring, they also reveal the names of the restaurants around the country that have been designated as "America's Classics." These awards are mostly given to family-owned regional restaurants that are "treasured for their quality food, local character, and lasting appeal." This year, the 31-yearold Perini Ranch Steakhouse in tiny Buffalo Gap, just outside of Abilene, has received this recognition. Austin foodies will know rancher, famed chuckwagon cook, and restaurateur Tom Perini as a founding member and former board president of Foodways Texas and the host of the annual Buffalo Gap Wine & Food Summit that sells out at the restaurant every April. Congratulations to Tom and Lisa Perini on the welldeserved accolade.

I was a judge during the second round of this year's Citywide 86'd competition held at the Escoffier School of Culinary Arts last Saturday, where employees from Barley Swine, Odd Duck, Olive & June, and Sway competed in the Chopped-like cook-off for a space in the finals in June. Barley Swine's Bradley Nicholson emerged as the winner of this second contest, sealing the deal with a quince ice cream served over a funnel cake created from a particularly difficult mystery bag of ingredients in the dessert round. FARMERS' MARKET REPORT

Pastured meats are made from animals raised out-of-doors, grazing on grass and able to walk about. Meat raised in this traditional manner is higher in omega-3 fatty acids and protein and has a better flavor than factory-farmed meats. It is a more expensive method, but the cost can be cut by buying directly from the ranchers and farmers themselves. Austin farmers' markets abound in locally pastured pork, beef, lamb, bison, chicken, and eggs. A few markets can even supply quail and cabrito. Find out where to buy fantastic pastured meat in Friday's online-only FMR (austinchronicle.com/ daily/food/farmers-market-report).

The Framed Burger

Burger Town

How do our hometown patties match up against the influx of trendy national chains?

Science has proven that Austin is known primarily for two types of food: barbecue and Tex-Mex, forever and ever, amen. Of course, what science doesn't know is that we've also been quietly enjoying a diverse complement of burgers from venerated purveyors for generations now, from the legendary variations at Hut's Downtown to the delightfully greasy UT-area stalwarts at Dirty Martin's, Players, and Burger Tex to the fancier, spendier burgers at Contigo, Hopfields, and ALC Steaks. In addition to the sentimental favorites, Austin has also hatched a handful of local chains - think the nostalgic mom-and-pop duo of Fran's and Dan's, the greasy delights of Hill-Bert's, the grass-fed goodness of Wholly Cow, and the fresh simplicity of Mighty Fine Burgers, Fries & Shakes. Most notably, P. Terry's has distinguished itself through its dedication to fast-food counter-programming in the form of responsibly sourced meats, hand-cut fries, and locally sourced produce. Simply put, Austinites are not without options when it comes to hometown burgers.

It's not just beef we're pressing between slabs of bread (or wrapping in lettuce leaves for the grain-free folks). You name it, we'll eat it in burger form, from Ahi tuna to buffalo, poultry to pork belly, and lamb to kangaroo (seriously - check out Wild Bubba's Wild Game Grill in Elroy). And we haven't even touched on the veggie-burger genre! (See sidebar, p.45.)

Despite this embarrassment of bun-clad riches, more and more iconic fast-casual national burger chains with cultish followings - namely, In-N-Out, Smashburger, and Shake Shack - are entering the Austin market with a vengeance. With that in mind, we figured that it's time to take a look at the local burger landscape. As more and more national chains vie for Austinites' burger dollars, how do local operations stay relevant? Sure, Smashburger and Five Guys have belly-busting sandwiches accompanied by deeply satisfying fries, but can they compete with the half-pound classic and side of crinkle-cuts from Mighty Fine? Folks have been flocking to In-N-Out for the double-double "animal style" (two mustardfried patties with pickles and grilled onions), swathed in special sauce and wrapped in Bible-verse-emblazoned paper, but can they hold up to the Longhorn Special (a doublemeat patty with special sauce) from Top Notch, a much-loved family-owned joint that boasts a cameo in Richard Linklater's Austin roman à clef, Dazed and Confused? What follows is a collection of Chronicle food writers' favorite local burgers, which we argue are reflective of Austin's diverse collective palate and keep-it-marginally-weird - Melanie Haupt

From Country to Uptown Class

Ever wonder what it was like to wander into a club during the era dubbed by the sainted Steven Fromholz as Austin's Great Progressive Country Music Scare? You may have to drive a little to still experience it, but out on Highway 71, nine miles past Bee Cave, there's a club called Poodie's Hilltop Roadhouse (22308 Hwy. 71 W., www.poodies.net). Originally owned by Willie's roadie, the late Poodie Locke, the place still maintains its Tex-centric values with an amiable bar crowd downing long necks and chomping on the Famous Poodie Burger, a handformed patty topped with green chiles, grilled onions, and pepper jack cheese. Order a double-double, and it's still less than \$10. Nothing fancy, just really good bar food and well worth the drive.

At the other end of the spectrum is **Trio** at the Four Seasons (98 San Jacinto, www.triorestaurantaustin.com), a place that embodies the best of what Downtown Austin eating has become – casually fancy food with gourmet foundations. At \$19, the Prime Burger had better be good, and it is. A handmade patty of prime beef topped with farm-fresh vegetables and bacon jam all add up to delicious diversion. Let your friends order the fancy stuff. When they see your burger, they'll be envious.

Stuff It

I love a good burger like few other things on Earth. While sometimes any ol' burger will do, I am usually quite picky about my choices. The Framed Burger at Ranch 616 (616 Nueces, www.theranch616.com) has been a favorite for years - I believe it was the first "stuffed" burger I ever ate. The 8-ounce Texas Black Angus beef patty "frames" a variety of changing ingredients, from bleu cheese to sautéed mushrooms, roasted jalapeños, or crumbled bacon, depending on whatever inspiration comes to chef Antonio Vidal. One thing you can bet on: It is always fresh, juicy, and cooked to order.

I also enjoy **Opal Divine**'s (multiple locations, www.opaldivines.com) extensive burger menu, all made with hormone- and antibiotic-free natural beef and as many locally sourced ingredients as possible. Standouts include the Divine Patty Melt, my favorite rendition of this diner standby in the whole city. But, since I love a spicy burger all that much more, I almost always go for the Urban Bubba, which puts a Texas spin on the popular "buffalo" burger by adding grilled onions, grilled jalapeños, and chipotle mayo to the classic bleu cheese and wing sauce toppings for a fabulous extra kick.

Insourcing Excellence

In a town full of terrific burgers, it's hard to believe that anyone would actually stand outside in Austin's epic summer heat for one. But the burgers at Hopdoddy Burger Bar (two locations, www.hopdoddy.com) regularly draw crowds willing to brave the elements as they wait upward of half an hour for a coveted seat. So what's the secret? For starters, Hopdoddy controls product by grinding their own hormone-free meat, cutting their own fries, and baking brioche buns inhouse. Of all the great burgers at Hopdoddy, the Buffalo Bill is the one that stands out for me. This droolworthy burger is made with bison meat, which is typically leaner than beef. Far from dry, however, the Buffalo Bill is a sloppy mess of grilled ground meat, bleu cheese, bacon, and spicy hot sauce.

Another burger I love is different from the fat, juicy patties that tend to make others purr wistfully. The thin-patty Big Hats at Hat Creek Burger Company (multiple locations, www.hatcreekburgers.com) are the comfy old sweatpants of burgers. Two spiced patties are flame-grilled and served on buttered, toasted buns. Like Hopdoddy, Hat Creek makes their burgers from hormone-free meat, grinds their own beef, and cuts their fries in-house, and it shows in the quality of your lunch. - Rachel Feit

Bawk Bawk Burger

Though chicken burgers often get a bad rap, what with the whole not being "real burgers" thing, the Counter Chicken Burger from Counter Cafe (626 N. Lamar, www.countercafe.com) brings local ingredients together in perfect harmony. Crowd into this Old West Austin haunt and belly up to

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






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the bar for the hand-ground, curry-seasoned, never-dry chicken patty, served with organic Bibb lettuce, tomatoes, and red onion on a wheat bun. For the ultimate in cosmic reciprocity, add bacon, jalapeños, and goat cheese.

Moving from sunny respectability to the dark side of Dirty Sixth – while **Casino el Camino** (517 E. Sixth, **www.casinoelcamino.net**) is famous for its attitude and legendary jukebox, the burgers are as straightforward and delicious as a shot of whiskey. Luckily, the burger joint/bar serves both. My personal favorite, the Amarillo, is served with roasted serrano chiles, jalapeño jack cheese, and cilantro mayonnaise. Perfectly juicy, spicy, and good enough to make a West Texas girl proud. – *Anna Toon*

Everything's Bigger in Texas

As with anything, sometimes bigger really is just better. And two of our town's burgers are not only big – like, really big – but also come with a cheeky, catchy name: Big Ass. It's fun to slide into a swanky booth at the posh Roaring Fork (two Austin locations, www.roaringfork.com) and tell your polished waiter that you want



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VEGGIE "BETTER" BURGERS

Card-carrying vegetarians and vegans aren't the only people who enjoy a good veggie burger, so it's not surprising to report that most restaurants here in Burger Town provide some semblance of a meat-free option (though the dedicated grills, and lack thereof, are another story). Some simply offer a veggie patty swapped for the original, but several boast staple menu items that could win over even hardcore carnivores.

What many consider the best vegan burger in town (nay, universe), the Bac'n Cheezeburger at **Ario's Vegetarian and Vegan Trailer** is, at least for now, no more. (What reportedly began as an issue with the propane system in December was complicated when their longtime host Cheer Up Charlie's moved, and has thus far prevented the reopening.) But several other tasty veggie burgers around town help ease the pain.

Two local products grace the pages of many beloved Austin restaurants' menus. Local company **Good Seed Burger**'s Hemp Veggie Patty – an amalgam of millet, hemp and chia seeds, fresh veggies and herbs, plus sprouted and dehydrated seeds – is featured in **Snack Bar**'s Happy Burger (1224 S. Congress, www.snackbaraustin.com) and the veggie burger options at Austin's **Alamo Drafthouse Cinemas** (multiple locations, www.drafthouse.com). Another local meatless patty, the **Hot Dang**'s Original Grain burger, combines barley, two types of rice, beans, cashews, and other fine ingredients and is available at local groceries and spots like **Hat Creek Burger Company**.

Superstar fancy burger joint **Hopdoddy** features La Bandita, a house-made black bean-and-corn patty topped with avocado, goat cheese, arugula, cilantro pesto, and chipotle mayo.

Meanwhile, local burger chain and masters of

keeping things simple and delicious, **P. Terry's** (multiple locations, **www.pterrys.com**), offers a beloved house-made veggie burger served up with the same shortlist of garnishes as the meaty versions. The matriarch of Austin's veggie community, **Mother's Cafe** (4215 Duval, **www.motherscafeaustin.com**), features its time-honored Bueno Burger with a special house recipe of seeds, grains, and tofu. For the raw foodies among us, **Beets Living Cafe** (1611 W. Fifth #165, **www.beetscafe.com**) created their Just-a-Good burger, a cornucopia of veggies and sprouted sunflower seeds and seasonings. The **Jackalope Bar** (404 E. Sixth,

www.jackalopebar.com) offers a spicy black bean patty, as well as a grilled portobello sandwich with Brie and caramelized onions. **Eastside Cafe** (2113 Manor Rd., www.eastsidecafeaustin.com) goes farm fresh and local with their own vegetarian Garden Burger, made of lentils, brown rice, herbs, and Monterey Jack cheese with a creamy lemon basil mayonnaise.

Meat-free burgers ought to have the same chance for celebratory gluttony as their comainducing, piled-high, stuffed beefy cousins, and two Austin spots are solidly on board. Downtown food trailer Svante's Stuffed Burgers (503 Colorado, www.svantesstuffedburger.com) devotes one of its five menu items to a lovely portobello mushroom burger stuffed with bleu cheese and topped with roasted red bells and a balsamic reduction. And Your Mom's Burger Bar (5001 Airport, www.eatatyourmoms.com) offers a vegetarian patty stuffed with cheese on any of their celebrity-themed burgers, such as the Willie Nelson - a gut-busting half-pounder tossed in honey barbecue sauce, stuffed with Cheddar, crowned with bacon and an onion ring, and served on Texas toast. - Jessi Cape

the Big Ass burger for lunch. He might size you up and suggest the Half-Ass burger instead: Scoff and tell him you came for the Big Ass. This three-quarter-pound patty will be worth the wait. Served with a daunting (and much-needed) steak knife and a little black kettle of crispy fries, this nearly-impossible-to-eat burger is delicious topped with roasted poblano peppers and thick, peppery bacon.

Monday nights, otherwise known as Big Ass Burger Night at popular Downtown bistro **Swift's Attic** (315 Congress, **www.swiftsattic.com**), get guests in the competitive spirit, as only 12 burgers are made. There is a new manifestation of huge and delicious every week. Guests can consult Swift's Facebook page on Mondays to see what form that night's Big Ass might take; one recent night was Italian-themed, with *arrabbiata* sauce, roasted peppers, onions, Italian sausage, and crimini mushrooms. As always, Swift's keeps it creative.

Burgers in Unlikely Places

Leticia and Celio Najera started **Mi Ranchito** in 2006 at the northwest corner of William Cannon and Pleasant Valley (5200 E. William Cannon), opening a much-need-

ed, much-larger location in Manchaca (1105 FM 1626) about five years later. Thank God they did, or we couldn't easily access their superb and mystical Mexican Burger, an 8-ounce patty topped with griddled chorizo and ham; I get them to add a smear of refried beans and white cheese, then ladle on the spicy green sauce and pico de gallo. Side fries are great, especially dipped in ketchup mixed with the roasted red salsa. Want to add carnitas, barbacoa, carne asada, or al pastor pork? Just ask.

Head northeast to the hip Eastside and seek out Ray Tatum's 3 Little Pigs trailer (1209 Rosewood, www.3littlepigsaustin.com). Tatum's AusTex chef-cred dates back to the Seventies, and he has consistently put out some of the finest food in these parts. A great example is his pork belly slider. which starts with slabs of natural, local pork belly that is slow-braised for five hours. The unctuous belly gets sliced and griddled to crunchy perfection with a soymaple glaze, then paired with tart apple slices and aromatic crisp-fried shallots, before nestling inside a yeasty mini Kaiser bun. Its running mate is a mound of crisp sesame slaw, making the whole package an exceptionally fine bite.


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










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Beginning With the End teaches us not to fear the reaper

Austin Gets a Slice of the Most Magical Place on Earth

Hang on to your mad hat for what could be the biggest Mondo show ever. According to Mondo Creative Director Justin Ishmael, "Nothing's Impossible" lets Mondo's favorite artists play with Disney's greatest creations. Every artist was allowed to pick their own title, with Disney's blessing, and the end result is a show featuring 35 posters from childhood favorites like Winnie the Pooh, modern classics like WALL-E, and even forgotten gems like The Cat From Outer Space.

Alongside Alice in Wonderland by Ken Taylor, here are three exclusive first glimpses. There'll be two versions of the meddlesome trio of Lock, Shock, and Barrel from The Nightmare Before Christmas by Graham Erwin, with an unmasked regular print and a masked variant: Tom Whalen goes deep into the blue for Finding Nemo; and Mike Mitchell, who had his own Mondo show last year, puts Mr. Incredible from The Incredibles in profile.

'Oh My Disney and Mondo Present: Nothing's Impossible" runs March 7-11 at the Mondo Gallery, 4115 Guadalupe. There will be a special, free family day on March 8, 9-11am, with refreshments and activities courtesy of Toy Joy. The Geckos Go Chameleon

The sun rises on Robert Rodriguez's 'From Dusk Till Dawn' TV adaptation

It's a dusty, windy day at the Mexico border. Texas Ranger Freddie Gonzalez is sprinting between cars, hunting for the most dangerous men in the state: the bankrobbing, blood-spilling Gecko brothers.

Over in video village, behind a rack of monitors, director Joe Menendez calls cut on another scene in the TV adaptation of From Dusk Till Dawn. Actors Zane Holtz and D.J. Cotrona, aka Richie and Seth Gecko, are hanging out with Robert Patrick, who plays lapsed pastor Jacob Fuller. Under Gonzalez's big black ranger's hat, actor Jesse Garcia turns and saunters over to the fence where visiting journalists are gathered to chat. Up toward the border crossing - actually the Austin Country Flea Market out on Highway 290 - Robert Rodriguez wields his DSLR and grins.

The show keeps Rodriguez busy, directing three of the first season's 10 episodes,

plus producing and scripting. When he's not patrolling the set, he's still able to keep up with the action remotely via video link. He said, "Right now, I'm talking on the phone, but I can also see the shooting on the lake." In part,

that's his job as producer, but it comes with perks. "I kept getting drawn to the screen, and Robert Patrick is doing this amazing performance. That's must-see TV right there."

Back in 1996, he and Quentin Tarantino were the enfants terribles of American cinema, their respective sophomore efforts -Desperado and Pulp Fiction - proving they weren't just indie darlings. Their first collaboration, From Dusk Till Dawn, was a cult hybrid: part dusty neo-noir, part Return of the Living Dead. Eighteen years later, Rodriguez has revamped the story for his



fledgling TV channel, El Rey Network. "The film was the short

story," he explained. "This is the novel." Unlike most producers, he didn't have to worry about selling an overly explosive pilot – after all, he runs the network. That space changed the script and how he directed the opening episode; Machete Kills' screwball speed is discarded in favor of a Peckinpah-esque slow burn. "I really enjoyed getting to let this breathe," he said. "What's cool is that you take Quentin's original script and get to make this epic tale where you can fill several seasons."

Characters like Ranger Gonzalez are new creations for the series. Others are resurrected from the original with major makeEpisodic, World Oremiere

overs, and none more so than Richie Gecko. Played in the movie by Tarantino as a twitchy psychopath, Holtz's version is darker, weirder, and plagued by strange supernatural visions even before sunset brings the plague of bats. The change was in part inspired by a friend of Rodriguez's who suffered from paranoid schizophrenia and couldn't distinguish reality from the voices in his head. Rodriguez said, "It was

very troubling to me, but I found a way to work that out through From Dusk."

Holtz described his Richie as "a classic horror character, in that he's a guy whose actions are not driven by his own problems, but that he's haunted by these demons." That said, it's not all nightmares and gloom, as he and Cotrona bonded through the criminal siblings' banter. "We're bickering about day-to-day things, but when the guns come out, we're the Gecko brothers." It helps that they get to wear the iconic garb of Tarantino killers. "I've worn a black suit in my life, but when you're doing a Robert Rodriguez film, and it's me and D.J. and we've got the guns and we're saying the lines and we're in the muscle car, it's a very cool feeling."

Somehow, that's always been the story of the Geckos: The legend gets bigger. The original movie concept was just vampires in a bar, and it was Tarantino that added the long crime intro as the brothers and their hostages break for the border. Rodriguez said, "He loved the desperados so much that he spent half the movie with the characters before they got to the bar." That became the film's radical second-act left turn, when the crime caper becomes a fullblown horror comedy. In the show, he said, "You feel the supernatural elements right from the beginning."

The long story arc allows Rodriguez to conjure up more of the Mesoamerican pantheon, too. Before the movie, Mexican vampires were rarely seen in the U.S. outside of tape-traded wrestling movies like Santo vs. las Mujeres Vampiro. As Rodriguez started researching the Mayan and Aztec gods, he found a rich mythology that had never made it to the screen before, and that he could only tease in the film in moments like Santanico Pandemonium's seductive performance. "That's where I came up with the snake dance, because I found this sculpture of a woman with a skull face, holding two snakes." With a guaranteed TV run, he said, "I now want to explore that world."

EPISODE GUIDE

Technically, the name SXSW Film is a misnomer. There was already a TV component when Janet Pierson became the Festival's film director in 2009, but her team's viewing habits began changing even more in 2012, when SX alumna and this year's keynote speaker Lena Dunham premiered the pilot of her HBO series, Girls. Pierson said it "was a perfect storm of accomplishment, with our filmmaker discovery who had this incredible, cutting-edge show."

After that, the Festival was inundated with pilot submissions, but Pierson's team was still cautious about having too many TV shows, instead taking time to create something that reflected their curatorial vision. This year, they launch the Episodic track, which Pierson described as "six series premieres that absolutely spoke to our sensibilities and what our registrants would be interested in."

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Nacho Average Thriller

Elijah Wood and Nacho Vigalondo update 'Rear Window' for the digital age BY RICHARD WHITTAKER

Do you know who's watching you? Really know? Do you even want to know? With techno-thriller Open Windows, director Nacho Vigalondo said, "I wanted to bring back the feeling of being permanently exposed as a negative thing."

In Open Windows, Nick Chambers (Elijah Wood) is the webmaster for a site dedicated to actress Jill Goddard (Sasha Grev) who finds himself dragged into a bizarre conspiracy to manipulate and expose the starlet using webcams and live feeds. Spanish native Vigalondo's first English-language film, set and partially filmed in Austin. uses the annual Fantastic Fest horror, sci-fi, and genre film

festival as its backdrop: Vigalondo went so far as to reenact the fest for the opening sequence, because it holds a special place in his heart and his career trajectory. His first two films, Timecrimes and Extraterrestrial, received their world and U.S. premieres there, and Vigalondo has become its unofficial mascot. He said, "It's a love letter to Austin and

Fantastic Fest, as much as telling a story involving extortion, torture, and murder can work as a love letter."

Wood, like Vigalondo, is a Fantastic Fest regular. In fact, the actor said, "I don't know if it could have happened without Fantastic Fest." His first filmed collaboration with the director was dramatic in a different way: The duo was locked in a Faraday cage at the FF 2010 closing party, headbanging as local arts/physics collective and America's Got Talent finalists ArcAttack played Slayer's "Raining Blood" using lightning from Tesla coils. "That happened, that really happened," said Wood. The pair had become email pals after Wood told the Spanish press how much he loved Vigalondo's 2007 debut, Timecrimes, and in 2011 the director told him about his idea for a movie set completely on a

laptop screen. "I've always wanted to work with Nacho," Wood said. "He's a very good friend of mine, and the concept's insane."

Like a high-tech Rear Window, Open Windows is a thriller with a gimmick: The entire movie is told in real time on Nick's computer monitor, through a mixture of video and audio feeds. It has all the hallmarks of a modern thriller, with tense surveillance sequences, car chases, shoot-outs, and virtualized grand larceny, but Wood didn't get to see much of the action. He said, "The actual shooting was a relatively solitary experience, in that I

was sitting in front of a camera or running with a camera, and looking at it or slightly below and imagining everything that was happening on my computer screen." He didn't even get to spend much time on set with his co-star. "It's not until the end of the film that my character interacts with Sasha Grey's character, because prior to that it was

all communication via webcam."

Film historians may look back on Open Windows as the third act of an unofficial trilogy of Wood movies playing with the cinematic fourth wall. First there was 2012's remake of sleazeploitation classic Maniac, told from Wood's POV as a deranged killer. Then last year there was the real-time thriller Grand Piano, written and directed by Vigalondo's old friend and Timecrimes composer Eugenio Mira. Like Open Windows, it casts Wood as the panicking pawn of a malevolent disembodied voice, a slave to an electronic god. Vigalondo called the similarities "a cosmic coincidence. I wrote Open Windows years ago, and Eugenio offered Elijah Grand Piano without knowing both movies would deal with a character

suffering the same set of threats. We even made jokes about including clues suggesting Elijah was playing the same character."

Vigalondo's movies have always blurred the line between high-concept sci-fi and kitchen-sink relationship comedies. In Timecrimes, schlubby husband Héctor (Karra Elejalde) struggles with his past and future selves as a time machine wreaks havoc on his marriage. His followup, 2011's Extraterrestrial, puts an awkward love triangle against the background of an alien invasion as Julio (Julián Villagrán) uses the threat of intergalactic war to turn a one-night stand into an extended sleepover. With Open Windows, the technology is less fantastical, but don't expect it to pass rigorous inspection for accuracy. "If you ask a geek, he'll tell you it's absolutely impossible for a current laptop to work the way it does in the movie," Vigalondo admits. "We have faked the syntax of the webcams, the security cams, the cell cams, but we manipulated the image where it made sense, for the benefit of tension or drama. As it happens with the best found-footage films, like the V/H/S series, we played with the rules instead of being slaves to them." He was far more interested in the technology making narrative sense, rather than subscribing to literal accuracy. "The first draft of the Open Windows script was written in 2008. If I tried to be realistic back then, the movie would be a period film today." When he finally started shooting, what intrigued him was how quickly people got used to cameras everywhere. "Two centuries ago we were worried a photograph could steal our soul, and now it feels like if you are never in the picture you may be the soulless."

The technology – and how it can be abused – would have been unrecognizable in the era of Vigalondo's inspiration, Rear Window. If any of James Stewart's neighbors wanted to stop the surveillance, they could just close the curtains, but it's not so easy anymore. Wood said, "We are a very observed people, and we choose to ignore it most of the time, because if we let that into our headspace, we could get very paranoid." It's not just government surveillance or professional paparazzi that have people worried. There have been multiple prosecutions of hackers who turned on someone's computer, console, or phone cameras without the owner's knowledge, and Internet security firm Norton has issued blunt advice: Don't have any webcam-enabled tech in your bedroom. "It's a software manipulation away from someone observing you in your space without you knowing it," Wood said. "It's a creepy notion." For him, what it comes down to is choice. "If you're an unconsenting person with someone trying to get something out of you, something vulnerable, that's an uncomfortable thing, regardless of who you are."

That question of consent makes Grey's casting as Jill even more pointed. Vigalondo wrote the part the year before Grey started her transition from the adult industry to mainstream cinema with Steven Soderbergh's The Girlfriend Experience, but, he said, "her identity as an ex-adult movie star not only echoes the character perfectly, but also gives a funny layer of irony." In key scenes, the camera becomes extremely intrusive, culminating in an uncomfortably erotic webcam session. He said, "The movie can be seen as a story about exploitation, and talks about how we came to a point when we, as a mass of consumers, have a crush on a teen star, to the point of demanding we see her naked, and at the same time we hate her loudly."





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Hell's Belle

'Hellion' marks Kat Candler's long road to overnight success

Step one to becoming an overnight success: Schedule a decade of prep. Step two: Add a few more years. (Who's counting?)

Meet Austin director/screenwriter Kat Candler. Her short "Hellion" premiered at the Sundance Film Festival in 2012. Check. She expands it to a feature film also named Hellion. Check. Said feature film attracts hot actor Aaron Paul of Breaking Bad fame and indie stalwart Juliette Lewis. Uh huh.

Feature premieres at Sundance in 2014. Check plus. Said feature film gets distribution deal through Sundance Selects. Candler brings it on home to Austin with a victory lap at South by Southwest. Now we're talking.

Flash back to 2000. Candler, then 25, is being interviewed for the first time ever prior to the premiere of her debut feature. Cicadas, at the Austin Film Festival. She carries a spiral notebook with a wish list of actresses for her next film. Kate Winslet? Liv Tyler? Her nervous smile is infectious. She's been in Austin three years, working days at BookPeople. She learned film from Steve Mims with classmates Scott Bate and Shawn Higgins, and the three hatched

Cicadas as a tale of teens trying to figure life out. "No matter how pretty it is or how great your effects, if your story stinks, it stinks," she says then.

Brandon Howe was 20 but looked younger when he auditioned for Cicadas. His reading bombed, he recalls, but the director agreed to let him improvise with film star Lindsay Broockman, and he got the part. "I remember her being like a little kid on set,"

says Howe, now living in Los Angeles and head of production for FilmOn.tv. "She was in control, but playful. I remember Kat having this very big heart. Now, looking back, I see that as a rarity in show business."

Candler now considers Cicadas a "good film that could have been better. I didn't know how to tell a story with the camera. I was much more comfortable with the actors than with lights and technology."

Today, the wall of her North Austin office at Arts + Labor features a poster for the 1982 teen rebellion flick Ladies and Gentlemen, the Fabulous Stains and lots of photos from the *Hellion* shoot in the Port Arthur region, including producing partner Kelly Williams'

hometown of Port Neches. The two drove to the oil refinery area and loitered in Blaine's Barber Shop, where Williams' dad gets his hair cut. Candler eavesdropped and took notes. "That's my favorite part of the process," she says. "You just go and immerse yourself in a world you don't know."

Hellion is about 13-year-old Jacob, who is into heavy metal and motocross, but reeling from his mother's death and acting out in increasingly dangerous ways as his father tries to connect with him. In his screen debut, Josh Wiggins is near-perfect in the lead. Candler's three feature films have shared an obsession with teen angst and parent-child relationships. "I don't have kids of my own," says Candler, who is married to major film fan Mark Osborn. "I want kids, but it just hasn't happened for us. Perhaps I'm living vicariously?"

Her husband says her filmic obsession is with the notion of morality. "My one-word arc for this film is from irresponsibility to responsibility," she says.

But perhaps Candler is also reliving semi-tomboy days of youth in Jacksonville, Fla., collecting tadpoles and playing in the dirt, chasing after her older brother while he built tree houses.

"I'm betting her favorite movie is something like Stand by Me," Howe muses. Bingo. And The Outsiders. For Hellion, add a dash of Lord of the Flies. The film's look is a faded Seventies-esque dream through cinematographer Brett Pawlak's lens. "Movies were so good then," Candler says.

"It felt like Hollywood wasn't editing. They took bigger risks in storytelling. It felt more real and honest."

After Cicadas, Candler's life had big changes: An important personal relationship broke apart, and she strengthened bonds with other Austin independent filmmakers like David and Nathan Zellner, Yen Tan, Duane Graves, James Johnston, and David Lowery. She

traveled to Sundance in 2001 just to watch movies. Afterward, Candler wrote like crazy and made a few independent films, leading her to team with Stacy Schoolfield and Lorie Marsh on her second feature.

"In early 2004, Kat asked me to help her out with auditions for this short she was directing, 'Roberta Wells," recalls Marsh, who now makes films from her home in Minnesota. "I spent the better part of the audition day hopping around pretending to be a 7-year-old imitating Peter Rabbit. We both shared an attitude about being nice and keeping auditions respectful, open, and playful. Kat actually cast me in the short, and it went on to premiere at Slamdance. Being on set for that shoot reminded me what I loved about filmmaking: human foibles, authentic performances, attention to nuances and craftsmanship, the teamwork and camaraderie.

There would be no alternative career for me: I was hooked."

Cicadas was Candler's undergraduate film program, but 2006's Jumping Off Bridges was graduate school, she says. It's about a teen boy dealing with the loss of his mother - this time to suicide. He and his friends make a game of jumping off high bridges into water.

Schoolfield, now a clinical social worker in Colorado, remembers hitting a brick wall while seeking permission to have the young actors jump off a bridge into Lady Bird Lake. "After a very long, hot day of shooting, we reluctantly attended a film industry event and spotted then-Mayor Will Wynn," she says. "Fatigue and desperation are great motivators, and we cornered him with a soda and asked for his help. Mayor Wynn agreed to jump off the bridge himself the day of the shoot, making our stunt a citysponsored event. This saved us a small fortune in fees for the necessary police boats and divers and made the key moment of the film possible. Getting a film made is a test of creative problem-solving."

These days the help Candler receives is from bigger friends, like George Lucas' Skywalker Ranch, where the crew spent two weeks mixing sound, courtesy of a grant from the San Francisco Film Society. A real Star Wars light saber on the wall! A Norman Rockwell original painting in the main house! "It was a bubble of tranquility and creativity," Candler says.

Williams and Candler and the Hellion

bunch were greeted just as enthusiastically in Port Arthur. They were given access to a high school football stadium and dance halls. Food and cookies appeared on set. For a scene involving youth football, a bus arrived with Pop Warner players, cheerleaders, and fans fresh from a game but ready to do it again for the cameras.

It's all about the kids for Candler. She flew to

the set of Need for Speed in Macon, Ga., to meet with Paul about her film. The echo in her mind: "Is he a nice person? Will he be cool with my kids?" He is. He was.

At the film's first major audition, Candler saw more than 100 kids and heard their heartbreaking stories. It's clear that this process is bigger for her than making a movie. "It's just that kids go through shit well beyond their years," she says. "I sometimes want to grab them - the families, the teachers. They don't ask these kids, who need to be able to get these things off their chests without doing it in a destructive way."

So, for the kids, Hellion is a chance for this filmmaker - this "overnight success" to give those kids, maybe all of us, one big hug. "I'm full of hope," Candler says. "It's just that the mistakes we make as human beings are way more interesting than the good choices we make."



Time Is on My Side (and My Other Side)

Wrap your head around wibbly-wobbly time-travel features like 'The Infinite Man'

If you could do it all over again, would you? Or would you just try to undo the bits you broke? That's the core dilemma of Australian time-travel rom-com *The Infinite Man*. So while scientist Dean (Josh McConville) thinks he can light the lost spark with his girlfriend Lana (Hannah Marshall) with a little bit of trans-temporal tampering, his past and future selves have very different plans. Director Hugh Sullivan called time travel "the best metaphor for the central character. Dean is always turned to the past, and has a very difficult relation-

ship with himself, so this film allowed us to approach those themes explicitly."

With only one location and three cast members – McConville, Marshall, and Alex Dimitriades as

Lana's narcissistic, javelin-throwing ex, Terry – Sullivan got to sit back and watch them bounce off each other and themselves as each character switchbacks misguided attempts to overwrite their own history. "I really enjoy watching those three performances, or nine performances in total," he said. "When you're working with time travel, a small cast becomes a lot larger, and the film takes on a greater density."

Producer Kate Croser – who has worked with Sullivan since his debut short, "Man Janson" – praised the writer/director for presenting "a very frank way of looking at the male mind." However, she also praised how he wrote Lana as more than just a chew toy for Dean and Terry to fight over. "Necessarily, this is the sort of film that has to be told from

one perspective, because it's already challenging enough to follow Dean's journey inside of himself. But we wanted to make Lana's journey as interesting as Dean's."

It helped that the location looks like something that fell out of a time warp. The producers were looking for a remote caravan park or hotel, but, Croser said, "Everywhere was just way too nice. Lawns and pools and beautiful landscaping." That's when they found Woomera: a Cold War-era missile test range in South Australia, with a semi-abandoned trailer park/motel that served as both the

location for Dean and Lana's multiple parallel dates, and the crew's sleeping quarters. Croser said, "It's so weatherbeaten and faded. It speaks of time when you look at it, and you think of the damage time

can do." The shoot was set for the high summer off-season, so the crew could have complete access without random tourists popping up in the background. Unfortunately, the Australian weather had other, unseasonable plans for ruining the day. Croser said, "We were prepared for extreme heat, but the Outback gave us another kind of beating. It gave us rain; it gave us wind; it gave us storms. It was out of control."

Not that it was all mud and misery. Sullivan added: "There was a bar on location, which helped morale quite a bit."

2014 is the year of the time-travel movie at SXSW, with Jack Plotnick (*Wrong*) directing Liv Tyler and Patrick Wilson in retrosci-fi comedy *Space Station* 76, the Spierig brothers reuniting with their *Daybreakers* star

Ethan Hawke in temporal crime tale *Predestination*, and raunchy coming-of-age comedy *Premature*, best described as *Groundhog Day* meets *American Pie*. Normally, the Festival doesn't double down on too many films with a similar motif, but this year, SXSW Film Director Janet Pierson said, "It became interesting to see how all these different people were doing something having that in common."

While they may all be tonally different. there are two parallel realities for any timetravel story. As Rian Johnson put it when debuting temporal headscratcher Looper, you can either follow the Primer model and wrap the audience in logical knots or you can go Back to the Future with nonsense science, but the audience instinctively gets that it's a timey-wimey thing. If Sullivan had his own time machine, he may well nip back and convince himself that writing something more Marty McFly-ish would have been a lot less troublesome than avoiding paradoxes. "If I'd known how difficult it would be, perhaps I would have done otherwise," he laughed. "We started with a tortuous one-page document, and developed that into a tortuous screenplay. As the scripting went along, I became more interested in the characters and the emotional journey, while still respecting the logic of the time-travel mechanisms."

That didn't make it much easier on the cast, who had to keep track of multiple iterations of the same part. "I really feel for Josh," said Sullivan. "A lot of rehearsals were spent drawing diagrams, but then he'd play one side and then leap across and play another of these wildly variant selves."







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
Unconventional Love Stories

There's more to love than the beginnings of a gradeschool valentine. Love is ... infinite yet confined within shifting parameters, fickle and concrete, unique but categorical, innate or culturally propelled. Three films premiering at SXSW this year offer revamped and fresh spins on the many forms of love, each employing one or more of love's four conceptual corners: the blinding romance of eros, the circumstantial conjoining of storge, philia's friendships, and the unconditional fluidity of agape.

In Animals, a pair of lovers fights the devastation of BY JESSI CAPE self-destructive burdens, their pain eased only by an

unwavering, if tested, commitment to each other. The Special Need sees two friends attempting to help their third musketeer as he struggles with a primal and allencompassing desire for physical love; they road trip through Europe on a mission, only to tap into a discovery rich in the quandaries of love. The Desert scales back common genre tropes of horror to explore animal behavior in its most rudimentary, sinister forms while a love triangle is destroyed. Desperation is a catalyst, the hierarchy is scrambled, and maybe love only wins sometimes.



Bobbie and Jude are madly in love, their passion fueled by routine escapes from the harsh reality of daily life. Drug addiction rules their kingdom, but their subsequent poverty cages them within a private prison. Written by and starring David Dastmalchian (Prisoners, The Dark Knight), opposite Kim Shaw, Animals is based on personal experience riddled by addiction and car-dwelling in Chicago's Uptown neighborhood, where it was largely filmed. The couple circles the Lincoln Park Zoo, holding hands in theft and schemes to score, estranged from their families but content in their beautiful pipe dream. But faced with sudden separation, the duo is forced to face the music. At the root of a full-circle plot, Animals offers a view of the often misunderstood behavioral anomalies of addicts in love. Though their

inherent cultural advantages - white, middle class - are acknowledged, skewed perceptions of self and circumstance abound. This twisted love story serves as an intimate portrayal of a plan, precariously balanced on razor's edge, gone awry. When one half is hospitalized, where will the other turn? Will they escape the rabbit hole? Will their love story survive?

In The Special Need, Enea wants to have sex. His carnal urge stems from the fundamental human need for physical touch and its emotional connectivity, but his autism both fuels and complicates his obsession. His friends Carlo and Alex see their friend's struggle, and the trio piles into a Volkswagen to fulfill his sexual quest, road-tripstyle. Broken into three segments, the film journeys from the origin story in Udine, Italy, to an Austrian brothel to a therapeutic sexuality counseling center in Germany. Though categorically a documentary, director Carlo Zoratti orchestrates scenes to demonstrate Enea's intimate predicament, lending a narrative quality. And, while the documentary style applied to a controversial and progressive subject could raise questions of exploitation, the original mission ultimately evolves into multiple concurrent love stories - not just Enea

and his sexual quest, but between the three friends, as well - breaking down preconceived notions of disability and tackling the cultural taboos of sexuality. Through tears and laughter and interesting sidebars on his perception of himself and others, Enea walks the learning curve, supported by his friends, as he slowly transitions his affections from magazine models to women he knows and ultimately recognizes his desire for companionship. Enea wants love.



It's a mad, post-apocalyptic world of brutality and undead outside the confines of a makeshift shelter in The Desert. What begins as a unified trio of survivors perhaps even an idealistic version of polyamory - splinters under the pressures of fear from the evils outside, and fractures under the loneliness and lies rooted in self-preservation inside. A far cry from genre-typical, The Desert shape-shifts from ill-fated love story to guttural scream as the eerily even-keeled suspense drives the household over the edge. This Argentinian horror film features only four characters stranded in a barren wasteland: Jonathan and Ana share a bed separated from Axel by only insect netting erected to deter the real-world versions of the thousands of flies tattooed as a time-marker on the odd man out. The fourth, a zombie whom Ana names Pythagoras, arrives climatically, when the two men capture him as a fulfillment of a bet.

House rules created in transparent attempts to regulate lives in turmoil provide glimpses of self ... until silent, unrequited love breaks character and unravels the thin veil of passion and inescapable pain.

In stories plagued with monsters and philosophy, rules are futile because perception defines action. If a film's connectivity is relative to its humanity, love's universal appeal resides in unconventional stories such as these.

About a Boy

On Aaron Swartz, the NSA, and the complicated story of digital reality

When Stewart Brand coined the iconic slogan of the Digital Age – "Information wants to be free" – he probably didn't envision how far the powers that be might go to keep information trapped between a firewall of lies, disinformation, and threats.

Brian Knappenberger's new documentary, The Internet's Own Boy: The Story of Aaron Swartz, provides a chilling example of how federal judicial overreach could and did end up with one young Internet idealist driven to the ultimate extreme while being hounded and pursued by the U.S. government. That would be Aaron Swartz, the Websavvy genius behind Reddit, Infogami, Jottit, and dozens of other Internet-centric projects, who committed suicide Jan. 11, 2013, at the age of 26, after being charged with multiple counts of wire fraud and 11 violations of the archaic Computer Fraud and Abuse Act after he downloaded hundreds of digitized academic journals, via MIT's servers, that had been posted by JSTOR, a digital library containing countless journal articles that, by all rights, should probably have been freely available to the public in the first place.

The Austin Chronicle spoke with Knappenberger by phone to discuss Swartz, the Stop Online Piracy Act, and the chilling effect of corporate power and an ill-informed government on the entire notion of freedom of information in an increasingly digitally complex society.

Austin Chronicle: What was it that first drew you to Aaron Swartz's story?

Brian Knappenberger: As a documentary filmmaker, you often look for small stories that have bigger meanings. One of the things that I found so fascinating about Aaron's story was, first of all, the number of accomplishments in a 26-year-old life. It's really remarkable. His early skills that let him put a lot of his fingerprints all over the Internet, along with his choice, his drive, and his move more into a kind of social justice realm after Reddit, and the things that happened to him, such as the government going after him and the obvious prosecutorial overreach: That all said a lot about our personal relationship with technology and the broken aspects of our Department of Justice. And there's no question that our criminal justice system is broken.

AC: Do you see that broken system changing anytime soon?

BK: My preferred choice of change is to tell stories about it and to try to get people to understand the problem in ways that are personal, moving, and compelling. I hope

Manning, Edward Snowden, Anonymous, et al., points to a huge disconnect between the government and digital reality.

BK: Yes, they're just not ready for the Digital Age. There's going to be a time when we have to sit back and ask ourselves, "What are traditional values, and what do we care about in terms of civil liberties?" The Fourth Amendment that protects us against illegal searches and seizures has served us pretty well since our country's inception. It not time to throw that out just because we're in the Digital Age.

AC: Do you think it's appropriate to call Aaron Swartz a martyr for the Internet, Net neutrality, and other related digital issues of the day? **BK:** Well, he has become that, but I resist that as a word. It's tough to remember a time now, after the Snowden revelations, when we didn't know about [NSA overreach]. Aaron was talking about it a full year before it became public knowledge. Those of us in and around the hacker community knew that there was something going on that was far beyond what we expected or was generally believed to be the case. He was incredibly articulate about it and very concerned about it early on. And he wrote about it and spoke out about it.

Spillers' Guts

Ashley Spillers stepped out of her comfort zone to write these 'love letters to Austin'

Ashley Spillers may have left Austin behind for L.A., but she's still doing plenty to rep her former hometown in this year's feature slate at South by Southwest. She appears in two SXSW premieres - Arlo & Julie, by writer/director Steve Mims, and Two Step, by writer/director Alex R. Johnson - and together with iconic sets and a prevalence of Texas' favorite pastime (drinkin' beer, of course), she brings an Austin feel to both films.

In Arlo & Julie, the title characters start receiving puzzle pieces in the mail. As pieces arrive, Arlo (Alex Dobrenko) and Julie (Spillers) become increasingly obsessed with constructing the puzzle and solving the mystery behind its sender. But don't be misled by the term "mystery"; the film isn't heavy. "We tried to make it fun. That's the first thing," says Mims. "Its ambition is to be a comedy."

Mims filmed in Austin and built many of the sets in the Communications building at UT, where he lectures. But that's not the only reason this light-hearted film captures the capital city so well. The then Austinbased cast played a big part too. "The script I wrote initially for Alex [Dobrenko]. Once we realized who all the main characters would be, he introduced me to Ashley, and she was terrific. So then I began writing specifically for her," says Mims. "It was really written for the two of them."

This made it easy for Spillers to connect to her character. "Our personalities, both mine and Alex [Dobrenko]'s, are very much ingrained in the story because [Mims] wrote it around us," says Spillers. "I didn't have to do anything extra on my part to put my

Spillers calls *Arlo & Julie* "a love letter to Austin," a title she says it shares with Loves Her Gun, a film by Geoff Marslett that premiered last SXSW. In it, Spillers plays Zoe, a character who suffers from unrequited love. It's much heavier than Arlo & Julie, and it ends tragically. Spillers' perfor-

mance in it caught the eye of director Alex R. Johnson and landed her a role in his 2014 release, Two Step.

Johnson characterizes Two Step – his first feature-length film - as a "throwback, classic thriller."

The film follows James (Skyy Moore), a young man who drops out of college and moves in with his grandmother. Shortly after his arrival, she dies, and James learns that a recently released convict named Webb (James Landry Hébert) had been scamming her for money. When Webb becomes desperate for more cash, things go south for James and others close to his late grandmother.

Spillers plays Amy, Webb's girlfriend whom he physically and emotionally abuses - a very different character from Julie and most of Spillers' previous roles. "Playing Amy was so cool for me," says Spillers. "I'm not yet often given the opportunity to stretch so far from a lot of the characters I play. A lot of the time they're very close to me and who I am. Playing Amy was such a cool challenge."

Johnson originally wrote the role for a different type of actress. "When you read the character description, [Amy] was written as a very thin, blond, road-worn-for-her-age, short girl," says Spillers. "And that's not me." But Johnson didn't cast Spillers for her physical resemblance to the original character sketch. "What I love about Ashley is that she obviously has dramatic chops. She's great in the film," says Johnson. "But she comes

> from a comedy background. She's got great timing. And I was looking for a little moment in the ten-

sion that would surprise me in the performance. And that's what she did."

Adding spontaneity to Amy's character wasn't the only casting challenge Johnson faced. "James was probably the hardest character to cast," says Johnson. "It's hard to find a person of that age - a young man in Austin or in Texas - that has a fragility about them. It's an epidemic. Everyone is trying to get on WB shows - doing far too many push-ups and pull-ups."

Like Arlo & Julie, Two Step has a decidedly Texas feel. But while the former turns a lovingly comedic lens on a young hipster couple, Two Step features a different side of Austin that's harder to pinpoint. "We wanted [the viewer] to not be able to exactly pin down when this is. That meant a decision to not incorporate what's been happening in Austin in the past few years," says Johnson. He offers an example: "We tried very hard when we shot the Broken Spoke to not get any of the condominiums in the shot, which is difficult."

Despite the differences, Spillers finds continuity between the divergent roles she stars in this Festival. This consistency extends beyond the fact that Amy and Julie both reside in Austin. Instead it relates to Spillers' acting methodology. "At the end of the day, whether I'm playing Julie or Amy, they're people. And you have to find the humanity there."





Leave No Stones Unturned

Stones Throw founder Peanut Butter Wolf on vinyl, hip-hop's roots, and record labels

The best music documentaries show their subjects as more than just the sum of their discographies. In Our Vinyl Weighs a Ton (This Is Stones Throw Records), director Jeff Broadway (Cure for Pain: The Mark Sandman Story) chronicles the highs and lows of Stones Throw Records, an L.A.based label that has evolved from an allvinyl outlet for underground hip-hop producers like Madlib and the late J Dilla into a cross-genre family of artists whose compelling personalities define them as much as their albums.

The label's 18-year history is recounted through archival footage and interviews with Stones Throw cornerstones as well as famous

fans like Kanye West. In advance of the SXSW screening of the film and Stones Throw's showcase, we talked to label-head Chris Manak (aka Peanut Butter Wolf) about the Stones Throw sound, the resurgence of vinyl, and whether or not you should start a record label.

Austin Chronicle: For those unfamiliar with Stones Throw, how would you describe the sound of the label?

Chris Manak: It's always music that gives me an emotional feeling. If it either makes me laugh or makes me cry, I'll probably like it. And when I say laugh, I don't mean overthe-top spoofy stuff. Most of the artists I work with have a sense of humor, and I think it comes across in the music.

AC: Stones Throw has always been a favorite of DJs. Was there a turning point when the *music started reaching a broader audience?*

CM: In terms of hip-hop, Madvillain and Donuts reached everybody who I wanted them to reach. Then there are albums like Mayer Hawthorne and Aloe Blacc that reached people who don't know about Stones Throw at all. Now Mayer and Aloe are opening up for Bruno Mars.

When I first started the label, there were no expectations; I just put out whatever I



liked. Now I have a staff of 12 people that I have to answer to. It's always that balance between

what I want to do and keeping the lights on, but I don't want to compromise the sound and put out some crap.

AC: How did the documentary come about? CM: These guys from France approached me and said they wanted to do a documentary for French national TV. They came to L.A. and stayed for a month. Every day they were with a different artist; it was really ambitious. We saw the footage, and it looked beautiful, very cinematic.

Some other guys from L.A. said they wanted to do one as well, and then the TV station said no to the French documentary, so they combined the two projects.

AC: The film features interviews with a few of the biggest names in rap like Questlove, Kanye West, and Snoop Dogg, who recently teamed with Dam-Funk for 7 Days of Funk. $Can\,we\,look\,forward\,to\,any\,future\,Questlove$ or Kanye West collaborations?

CM: I've known Questlove for so many years. We DJ together a lot, and he'll call me when he's in town and we'll go record shop24 Beats Per Second

ping. He's someone I admire greatly, but we've never really talked about it. He really likes Gary Wilson. I think that would make sense for Stones Throw.

With Kanve, he loves Madlib, he loves J Dilla, and he's a fan of Mayer Hawthorne, too. He invited them into his house and spoke so much, I couldn't believe how into it he was

AC: I heard Madlib almost contributed some beats to Watch the Throne. Is that true?

CM: Madlib once called me and said that Kanye came over to his studio and stayed until 5am. It was Kanye, Madlib, and MF Doom. He chose a lot of tracks, but the way Madlib makes music, he samples a lot but doesn't always write down where the samples are from ...

AC: One of the major themes of the documentary is that the label's love of hip-hop led to an appreciation of the genres that hiphop grew out of, like jazz and funk. What are some Stones Throw releases you'd recommend for someone looking to explore the roots of hip-hop?

CM: In terms of jazz and funk, there's Yesterdays New Quintet and some of Dam-Funk's stuff. Chrome Canyon is a record I just put out that sounds like a lot of the records we were sampling from when we were making hip-hop. It's new music, but you can't really tell what time period it's from.

Myron & E is a record with more of a Northern soul and doo-wop sound. And Madlib always challenges himself with different genres. Right now he's working on a dark, industrial, minimal wave album. He asked me to sing some vocals on it.

AC: Vinyl records have always been a big part of the culture at Stones Throw. With vinyl's resurgence in the past few years, are you sell*ing more vinyl than at the start of the label?*

CM: When I started the label, it came out of the turntablism movement. I was only putting out vinyl; I didn't even want to put out CDs because I thought they were so corny. Digital wasn't around yet, and iTunes hadn't even launched.

If you're just looking at sheer numbers, we're not selling as much vinyl as we were. When I started the label, there were records that would sell 50,000 units on vinyl alone. Now if you sell a few thousand units, you've done really well. It's not that vinyl sales have increased; it's that everything else has decreased so much that it's made it newsworthy.

AC: What advice would you give to someone who's looking to start a record label?

CM: If you're gonna start one, I'd say don't. Unless you don't care about security. It's a lot of ups and downs. Maybe a younger person might have different expectations than me, but I was there in the Nineties when people were selling a lot of units and you could really make a living off of it.

It's pretty well known that the record label is a dinosaur. If you think about music up until the 1900s, music was never recorded to be sold. There was music as far back as we know, but the record industry is only 100 years old. And maybe music was never meant to be sold, just given for free.







Seeing the Invisible

Margaret Brown dives headfirst into the BP Gulf oil tragedy

"Why is the Gulf open?" asks a local fisherman/shrimper, holding up a bag of freshly caught Gulf shrimp, the color of which is off-putting, to say the least. Folks along the Gulf of Mexico may enjoy "blackened" cuisine, but not dripping black, and the discharge from this thawing crustacean is definitely not appetizing.

The fisherman's neighbor, Roosevelt Harris, a volunteer at Hemley Church's food pantry in Bayou La Batre, Ala., is there informing folks affected by the BP oil spill about an upcoming community meeting with an attorney handling claims. Harris is like a black Paul Revere, driving through the area the locals call Hardluck City, encouraging people to get their share of the

settlement. Most live in rundown trailers, school buses, or boats festooned with Confederate flags and commiserate with Harris but, in the end, avoid the meeting.

When Transocean's Deepwater Horizon, striding the second-big-

gest oil reserve in the U.S., exploded on April 20, 2010, and began a five-month gush of crude oil, it not only threatened the livelihood of so many Gulf Coasters, it destroyed lives – 11 men died on-site that day.

Filmmaker Margaret Brown grew up in Mobile, Ala., spending summers along Mobile and Perdido bays. "The water's inextricable to life on coastal Alabama." The Austin-based director (Be Here to Love Me, The Order of Myths) brought her cameras home to grasp the impact of this manmade disaster.

"We're connected to this invisible factory under the Gulf of Mexico," says Brown of the more than 3,500 platforms (each connected to as many as 20 wells) in the Gulf.

An animated sequence in the film deftly illustrates this, using Deepwater Horizon as a centerpoint and splashing a rash of tiny red dots to indicate each platform – like a nasty case of Gulf measles.

"We don't think about where the oil we put in our cars comes from," she says. "It's hidden from us, partly because we live comfortable lives and partly because there's an agenda to keep it hidden." Brown learned this firsthand while soliciting subjects for *The Great Invisible*. "Many ... settled [financially], signed nondisclosure agreements. There's a cone of silence."

Despite frustrations, she spent three years convincing people to go on the record with their Gulf-tragedy realities: people

like food-pantry volunteer Harris, like two Transocean employees who witnessed and survived the blast and who have the brutal pangs of PTSD to show for it, like the father who lost a son and testified in front of the

U.S. House subcommittee.

"It was hard," she says; a lot of these folks have "been hounded. One of them thought I was a spy from Transocean." Her search across the Gulf led her to Houston, where she connected with leaders in the oil industry and scored interviews with heavy-weights like Bob Cavnar, Texas energy industry vet and author of the book Disaster on the Horizon, and Kenneth Feinberg, the third-party attorney brought in to handle settlements.

In two surprising scenes, a roundtable of oil executives speak candidly, even giddily about the industry they have done well by – one they see as in a renaissance. "Energy has been cheap in the U.S. for the last 100

years," says one captain of industry as puffs of cigar smoke drift into the air. "Americans think it's a birthright," another says against the clink of ice in a glass. "I don't think people realize how lucky we are."

Brown insists on not villainizing the men willing to talk on camera. "Those guys are all independents. They don't work for huge companies like BP, Exxon, Transocean. If they did, they would have never talked to me. We tried to talk to the majors, and no one would ever talk.

"These are people who trust me now," she says. "I told them, 'Your perspective is not one that people hear, and I'm interested in that perspective. The oil industry doesn't talk. Will you?' And they wanted to."

Ultimately, "we're all complicit," Brown argues. "I'm sitting here using a plastic glass that's made out of petroleum byproducts right now ... and I just spent the last four years making a film about this. Clearly, we're all hypocrites. I think we all have to come together, all of us hypocrites, and figure out a way to make this shit better. It's not about pointing fingers."







Shadow on the Ground

Matt Muir's 'Thank You a Lot' tackles the tensions of performance

Before local filmmaker Matt Muir even knew that James Hand was either able or willing to act in his debut feature, $Thank\ You\ a\ Lot$, he had written the enigmatic, somewhat reclusive country songwriter into a lead role in his script by name.

"He's just so compelling and unusual and has such an interesting energy that you just wouldn't expect, an old-school honky-tonk guy that's not like an homage or quirkiness," laughs Muir, sitting on the couch in the office of his production company, Revelator, which he runs with the film's producer, Chris Ohlson.

"I talked to his manager, and I totally lied, said, 'I have this script I've written and this one part that I think would kind of be good for James, that he'd fit the role and maybe be good at it. Do you think he'd be interested in being in a movie?" Muir confesses. "So I printed out a copy of the script and gave it to him, and of course the character is named James Hand and singing James Hand songs. But he just never brought it up. I was going to change the name for a while, because it's of course a fictionalized version of James Hand, but he said, 'Whatever you want to do."

Prior to Hand's role being written into the script, Muir's film focused on a seemingly unscrupulous music manager (Jack Hand, played with antihero, underdog perfection by Blake DeLong) hustling through the contemporary Austin music scene managing tensions with both his artists and

his corporate company. The introduction of Hand as his estranged father, a reluctant country artist choked by his own failures and mistakes, provided a new depth and hefty emotional substance to the film.

"I feel like a lot of films – especially if it's the indie rock scene – they're trying to be cool, but no one really cares," Muir says. "And that story

wasn't the heart of the movie, that wasn't there yet. But you put James there, and you have some compelling stuff going on, and you just want to know about him – where his energy comes from and what motivates him. So the movie went in a different direction."

against as he navigates between the fluorescent-lit, high-rise offices and the grungy back alleys of Austin's club scene.

When Jack's boss gives him an ultimatum to either sign his father to the management company or be fired, it launches a journey scarred with long-covered wounds and familial regrets. At his father's house, Jack also finds a documentary filmmaker, Allison (Robyn Rikoon), camped out while working on a film about Hand. Importantly, the interspersed interview footage allows Muir to work the songwriter's own notoriously harrowing and heartbreaking words (see "Where the Shadows Are Deepest," Music, May 5, 2000) into the script.

"I technically scripted [Hand's lines], but a lot of it I just pulled from things that he said to me, or things that I read about him," Muir acknowledges. "I met him, and just started reading all the *Chronicle* articles about him. The loneliness and his fear and the kind of weariness that he just brings along and the fact that he came to the public eye after so long but had been playing in public since he was, like, 11. So much of that informed it, and it was just stuff that he had already said."

Hand's recollections for Allison's documentary in the film, though ripped with an authenticity of the songwriter's real-life regrets and anxiety, heightens the film's almost meta exploration of performance.


From the opening scene of Hand running through his stage banter to an empty field, to the ambiguous closing moment of Jack leaning against the Mohawk's brick wall solemnly (or determinedly) smoking a cigarette, $Thank\ You\ a\ Lot\ suggests\ we're\ all\ playing\ roles,\ casting\ ourselves\ against\ our\ fears\ and\ insecurities\ and\ incongruences$

between how we see ourselves and how we present ourselves to the world.

"To me there are kind of two ideas about performance in the movie," offers Muir. "Jack doesn't really stand back and appreciate what it's like to be an artist and performer and to create something and play it publicly. I don't think he's analyzed that aspect of their lives before he

puts them in certain positions.

"Then the other thing that he may not realize is that he is a bit of a performer, and we wanted to draw that line between him and his dad," Muir continues. "But I don't think he really understands that either. He has his own way of performing. I think there are a lot of people that wouldn't consider themselves creative, but in their business or their job they have to put on a performance."



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Because I Could Not Stop for Death

'Beginning With the End' teaches us not to fear the reaper

We Americans are weird about death. It is entertainment in the form of violent video games, television, and movies. We attempt to beat it back through diet and exercise and quitting smoking once and for all (we really mean it this time!). When a celebrity dies, we stalk TMZ, hitting refresh in hopes of seeing the footage of the body bag being wheeled out of the brownstone, and then we write long thinkpieces about what we lost when the entertainer in question shuffled off this mortal coil. The reality of death is so removed from our daily experience that when a young person impulsively snaps a selfie with a cadaver while on a field trip to a medical school, it lays bare the fractured, dysfunctional way we deal with death.

There exists, however, a growing document in our culture of ways that some of us are trying to take death on its terms, authentically and stripped of the veil of entertainment and taboo. Time of Death is a recent Showtime docuseries that follows terminally ill patients in the final weeks of their lives, even up to their final breaths, surrounded by family and caregivers bearing witness to a person's most intimate moment: their exit from this world. Now there is also Beginning With the End, David Marshall's documentary focusing on high school students enrolled in an elective class that trains them as hospice volunteers. They start out by learning basic comfort care: adjusting pillows, providing water, and so on. Yet, as they settle into their roles as caregivers to the ailing, they learn the value of simply being there.

One particularly striking scene depicts one of the young women sitting at a kitchen table, doing her homework in companionable silence with a hospice resident reading the newspaper. "Some of these kids move toward the bedside to help somebody and find that their help is really valuable; they see themselves in a different light. Over time, they come to realize that their presence is really all that's needed," says Marshall. "It's obvious that this is part of who we are. If you're given a chance to be empathetic and compassionate and vou're given some tools and the faith that you can do it, you can."

The film's angle, as expressed by Bob Kane, the English teacher who guides the students through the class, is that the act of reframing death empowers people to live a better life. We don't need to go to the woods to live deliberately: We just need to live our lives in each moment, with one another. "No one talks about the job they had at the end of life, or the school they went to or the





car they drove, the money they made," says Marshall. "What people talk about is who they loved and who loved them. That's a valuable lesson for 17-year-olds to learn. What language do I want to use at the end to describe my life? If you can start to look at your life in those terms, you can have an extraordinary experience."

Indeed, kids today grow up focusing on having the best college applications, the best internships, the best credentials to position themselves for a bright future. What the teens in Beginning With the End experience, though, isn't so much college readiness but life readiness. Marshall agrees. "This kind of heart-centered learning is so necessary," he says. "We're in a society where so much of our engagement is not real; the process of just having a oneon-one relationship is getting harder and harder to have."

This truth bears itself out onscreen. As the movie closes, one girl tearfully reflects on her experience in hospice class. "It's scary to fall in love with a person, and then they die. But it was worth it to fall in love with those people."

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












Sound Bleed: SXSW Interactive/SXSW Music

Monday afternoon, the South by Southwest office was predictably under siege. Outgoing mail buried the lobby, workers occupying every nook in a honeycomb of cubicles emailed feverishly, and the front desk phones rang off the hook.

"Not now! Call back in April." commanded one receptionist to a band inquiring about showcasing at next year's Festival.

All of Austin music must feel the same way right about now: Just get us through the next 10 days. After that, it's all gravy. Upstairs, SXSW Music boss James Minor pled the fifth about the keynote speaker, but rumor has it that an announcement may come down Friday, so stayed tuned to our website. Otherwise, Festival blasts have been free-flowing all week.

Compton MC Kendrick Lamar was added to ACL Live at the Moody Theater's iTunes Fest as Wednesday's headliner, and the free entertainment at Butler Park expanded with a Jimi Hendrix tribute the following night featuring Slash,

Wayne Kramer, Robbie Krieger, and Perry Farrell. This week, news also arrived of Belle & Sebastian singer Stuart Lee Murdoch taking part in a SXSW interview and presenting his film God Help the Girl. Nas and Flying Lotus will play the Austin Music Hall next Friday and 50 Cent headlines a Tuesday night showcase at 1100 Warehouse, now known as Fair Market.

Fiddy's warehouse show runs simultaneous to the **SXSW** Interactive closing event at Stubb's, with the rap cadre of 2 Chainz, Method Man & Redman, and Pusha T blurring the lines between the conference's Interactive and Music portions and making us wonder how many years until the latter annexes Monday to its calendar.

Running Friday through Tuesday, SXSW Interactive includes an appearance by **Neil Young**, though the legendary rocker will only be singing the praises of his new listening technolo-

gy Pono. Tech companies secured music regardless: Kiip brings Biz Markie to the Madison on Saturday, while PayPal and BrainTree host Snoop Dogg on Sunday at Stubb's.

A new event, the **Hackathon Championship**, combines the Music and Interactive disciplines of SXSW, calling on hackers, designers, and programmers to create a new tech innovation that will benefit the music industry for a \$10,000 top prize. The free, public event begins Wednesday, 2pm, at the **Hilton** and runs 24 hours. Prototypes will be evaluated by a panel including **Edward Sharpe & the Magnetic** Zeros' singer Alex Ebert and Young Money president Mack Maine. The three winning projects get announced next Friday, 6pm, at Base - the old La Zona Rosa.

As the Music Fest approaches, sponsors continue to roll out their events, including the notorious Fader Fort, which just booked Chromeo; the highly secretive Illmore party, copromoted by Scoremore; Ray-Ban's EDM-heavy Boiler

Room concert; TV cook Rachael Ray's day party with Cee Lo, Blondie, and Foxboro Hot Tubs; and the Thrasher Death Match at Scoot Inn.

The latter, four days of punk, metal, rap, and indie, reminds me of bygone SXSW happening Mess With Texas.

While SXSW 2013 featured tributes to fallen music director Brent Grulke, this year's fest mourns Lou Reed with a starstudded concert Friday, March 14, at the Paramount Theatre. Get a load of this partial roster: Black Lips. Dead Boys axe grinder Cheetah Chrome, Alejandro Escovedo, Louise Goffin, Garland Jeffreys, MC5 guitarist Wayne Kramer, Spandau Ballet, Suzanne Vega,

and a dozen others. Former Bongos frontman Richard Barone, who met Reed in a guitar shop in 1979 and remained close, says the event will feature rare video and photos from Reed's personal collection. And dig the backing band: Blondie's Clem Burke on drums, the Voidoids' Ivan Julian on guitar, and Tony Shanahan and Lenny Kaye from Patti Smith's band. Look also for longtime Reed cohort Bill Bentley's old Austin band the **Bizarros**, who from 1977-79 featured **Velvet Underground** guitarist **Sterling Morrison**.

For the daunting task of familiarizing yourself with SXSW performers, I recommend listing to SXSWfm, the Festival's online radio station. Tune in at www.sxsw.com/fm or download the free app for your phone.

CHANGING OF THE GUARD AT THE AUSTIN MUSIC AWARDS

Within the global music and media frenzy that is SXSW, the Austin Music Awards bring a necessary local focus. The ceremony, which predates the Festival, awards the highest vote-getters in the Austin Music Poll, a completely write-in tally of the city's favorite bands and instrumentalists, by category.

This year's AMAs, held at the Convention Center's Austin Ballroom on Wednesday, March 12, includes performances by Lucinda Williams, the Texas Tornados, Asleep at the Wheel's Ray **Benson** with jazz extraordinaires **Church on Monday**, EDM standout Francis Prève, and the generation-bending Youngbloods Choir. The

25-member Minor Mishap Marching Band will lead a mini parade around the Convention Center, up the escalators, and onto the stage where they'll kick off the festivities at 8pm.

AMA organizer Margaret Moser knows the results and says she's "thrilled with the diversity in this years voting," so it looks like we're going to see some new bands conquer the podium this year.

"It's okay for Gary to step aside and let someone else win," she joked about Gary Clark Jr., who won eight awards last year. "We're going to see newcomers welcomed into the top ranks in ways that are unprecedented."

As reported earlier, next week's AMAs will be Moser's swan song, retiring after 30 years of doing the show. Expect special guests galore celebrating her send-off, including a Rock & Roll Hall of Fame group who'll be guest presenting. There will also be genuine legends of Texas music making appearances during the night's final performance from the Tornados, led by Doug Sahm's son Shawn Sahm, who Moser's known since he was knee-high to a case of Pearl beer.



Half Notes

- Three essential slabs of Texas punk history from Eighties hardcore warriors the **Offenders** - 1983's We Must Rebel, 1984's I Hate Myself, and 1985's Endless Struggle - have been committed to vinyl on a new double LP on Southern Lord. A reformed version of the band, which was integral in Texas' vibrant hardcore scene that included acts like D.R.I. and MDC, and includes original singer J.J. Jacobson and drummer Pat Doyle, performs at **End of an Ear** on Friday, 6pm.
- The Good Music Club gleaned live recordings from its Laurie Gallardo-curated concert series into another compilation of choice Austin music: League of Extraordinary Gz. the Wolf, Shakey Graves, Megafauna, Nakia, and an especially badass prog-classical instrumental from **Digital Antique**. GMC Vol. 2, mixed by Curtis Henderson, mastered by Erik Wofford, and illustrated by Chepo Pena, was financed by the city's music division and will be free at the ATX Music Office's SXSW showcase at the Main (old Emo's) on Tuesday, March 11.
- > Black-clad synth force S U R V I V E lug their arsenal of vintage keyboards into End of an Ear on Saturday, 6pm, for a performance in conjunction with the release of a 12-inch vinyl EP. MF064, out on Austin's **Monofonus Press**, was inspired by the local quartet's acquisition of a particular piece of vintage audio gear, the KR-55, an analog rhythm box with preset beats that adds a new groove to their synthronica sound. After the performance, the band heads down to the Marchesa Hall & Theatre for the SXSW Film screening of The Guest, a new horror film that includes their music.
- Austin City Limits unveiled a partial lineup of artists taping for the PBS show's 40th season. Nick Cave & the Bad Seeds make their debut appearance on July 20, while Chicano rock champs Los Lobos return for the fifth time on April 14. A pair of acts who played ACL Fest 2013, Thao & the Get Down Stay Down and country realist **Eric Church**, tape on Aug. 14 and Sept. 23, respectively, while Americana starlet Valerie June tapes May 28.

Passionate Kisses

2013/2014 Austin Music Awards: Lucinda Williams plants one on Margaret Moser

A long, thick line stretched along Waterloo Records' facade. Inside, rising like cornstalks among the music racks, Austinites. Every size, shape, age, race, class. All of them waiting. Buzzing.

At half past the appointed hour, someone finally got onstage to quell the unconcerned assemblage. Store owner John Kunz? All I recall is the shrug, communicating the obvious: We don't know where Lucinda Williams is either.

Fair enough. Two weeks of Free Week -South by Southwest for and by the homies had finally petered out over the weekend. (Pant, pant.) Time to wait out winter for SXSW, take down the Christmas tree maybe. Annually, in the relentless pursuit of local music, January's a sweet spot: free, homegrown, chill. Lucinda Williams in-store/encore.

"She didn't even apologize for being late," I marveled afterward to my wife.

"Why should she?" retorted Agnes.

Indeed. Williams took Waterloo's stage at 5:38pm, with a steely look in her deep blue ocean eyes, and 39 minutes later left with our collective breath. A reissue of 1988 breakout Lucinda Williams - "I Just Wanted to See You So Bad," "Changed the Locks," "Passionate Kisses" – prompted the Tuesday rush-hour gathering, but the singer's raw country soul answered the real reason for the meet. Communion.

For the congregation, the best years of our lives in song: desire, heartbreak, memory. To the preacher, affirmation, love. Perhaps we owe Lucinda Williams an apology. We are not worthy. We took money and time off, packed together our adulation, yet our musical town hall also dragged along expectation, wish fulfillment. Where do we get off? Muhammed brought the mountain, we took smartphones. Williams' Gulf Coast cry - primal, aching, sating - remains a gift of community. Those songs are bare and bold, far bigger than 5pm sharp, and timeless. Passed down.

FIRST YEAR: "Year one at Club Foot in 1983. Bob Simmons produced. I had no official title but did lots of whatever needed to wrangle musicians, which kept me busy all evening."

YEARS PRODUCER: "1984-88, '92 to present. E.A. [Srere], who'd been my second in command all those years, directed '89, '90, and '91."

YEARS RUNNING THE AUSTIN MUSIC POLE [SIC]: "LOL. 1992 to present."

BEST YEAR: "I should aretired after Springsteen in 2012. Nothing will ever top that."

BEST ANECDOTE: "Oh geez, why do all the fuck-ups come to mind instead of the triumphs? Like Paul Ray mis-announcing the Crickets instead of Nanci Griffith. My fault.

"I think my favorite unexpected moment was coming around the side of the stage at the Austin Music Hall and seeing Talking

Heads and Britt Daniel mesmerized by Mother Falcon. Three distinct generations of music right there.

"Listening to Kris Kristofferson say words I wrote but he memorized and spoke as if he'd written them himself was unreal.

"Then there was the year Robert Plant complained what a low-budget affair the Awards were ..."

BEST LOUIS BLACK [CHRONICLE EDITOR-IN-**CHIEF]:** "We were standing by the side of the stage at the [Austin] Music Hall, holding our breath as John Cale walked onstage with Tosca and played for Sterling Morrison. When the music started, we looked at each other, held our hands out in front of us, flopped our wrists like bunny paws, and hopped around with joy. In public."

BEST LUCINDA WILLIAMS AMA MOMENT: "Her singing 'Hot Blood' at the '93(?) show with Gurf Morlix playing slide."

Others play the prom, of course, serenade the belles of the ball. If anything, Moser booked her swan song specifically. From opening doors with guerrilla brass battalion Minor Mishap Marching Band to exiting Austin's DIY Grammys one final time in a gust of Texas Tornados. Bandleaders Augie Meyers, Flaco Jiménez, and Shawn Sahm, drummer Ernie Durawa - Louie Ortega, Speedy Sparks, Nunie Rubio - all stood with Doug Sahm and Freddy Fender at the Alamo. Texan pioneers who died for the cause: music. Blues, country, Tex-Mex, conjunto. Only Bob Wills/Buddy Holly/Willie Nelson match up in Lone Star integration.

First time I heard the words Gary Clark Jr.? Margaret Moser. Sarah Jarosz? MM. Grammy recognition for both this year. And they're already elders. John Caleendorsed, chamber-pop orchestra Mother Falcon, Ivey & the Wicker Suitcase star Grace London, the Peterson Brothers' molten blues ascendancy - all Moser picks. They're today. And look out, because as the song goes, here comes tomorrow: the Youngbloods Choir. Match the supergroup's surnames – (William Harries) **Graham**, David Z, (Marlon and Finley) Sexton, (Lily and Io) Hickman - with those of their special guests: Jon Dee Graham. Will and Charlie Sexton, Sara Hickman.

Up on Austin's future? At Alejandro Escovedo's United Sounds of Austin concert three days before Lucinda Williams at Waterloo, William Harries Graham, Marlon Sexton, and the Painted Redstarts closed the almost three-hour romp through local music lore by covering the host and Jon Dee Graham's three-guitar army the True Believers. Talk about chipoff-the-old-block torque. Worlds collided, atoms split.

That same siege saw grinning Austin son Elias Haslanger raise his tenor sax in cuing the better part of his Church on Monday band-cum-service (Monday nights f-r-e-e in the Continental Club gallery): organ grinder Dr. James Polk, next great Austin axeman Jake Langley, drummer Scott Laningham, and bassist Daniel Durham. When was the last time you saw a rock & roll show oneupped by jazz? Standing ovation, yo. Asleep at the Wheel driver Ray Benson going Ray Price on them with a guest spot? One can only hope.

And Francis Prève? Three words: EDM. Electronic Dance Music. Margaret Moser's decreed it. Austin's John Hammond (Dylan, Springsteen, SRV), she - my colleague/ puppet master/sister/mother/stooge/fellow Stones pledge/Monkey Woman Too of 20 years - appended "stuff you didn't ask for" in her AMA email to me:

BEST SURPRISE PERFORMANCE: Stevie Ray Vaughan & Double Trouble flying in from the CBS Convention in Hawaii and premiering the entire Couldn't Stand the Weather album to a packed [Austin] Opera House 1983.

MOST UNEXPECTEDLY SUCCESSFUL RESULT OF AN AMA SET: Roky Erickson and Okkervil River recording together.

BANDS THAT REVIVED THEIR CAREERS AFTER REUNITING FOR AMA: Bubble Puppy and Wagoneers.

NOTABLE MEMORIAL TRIBUTES: Doug Sahm. Townes Van Zandt, Walter Hyatt, Brent Grulke.

PROUDEST OF: Bringing the younger generation into this. Whether they're working for me on staff backstage or playing onstage or winning awards or creating the poster, the kids really are all right. Seeing Bernie Worrell squire the Peterson Brothers around backstage last year was a trip. Watching Gary Clark Jr. win his Grammy was like ultimate affirmation that everyone who voted for him last year in the Chronicle poll was right.

BEST LAUGH BEHIND THE SCENES: About four years ago, [emcee] Andy Langer hadn't tried on his tux before the show and found the pants were too big. First, we safety pinned them, but they didn't hold. Then we stapled them, but they came loose. So we ended up duct-taping him into his pants.

BEST BEHAVED GUESTS: Little Steven Van Zandt, Jonathan Demme, Sandra Bullock.

Bless you, Margaret Moser. RSVP + 1. ■

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
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Super Tuesday

First night SXSW showcase spotlights and Picks & Sleepers

Texas primaries mostly sorted themselves out on Tuesday, but a week later, a whole other crop of hopefuls flood the Lone Star landscape. Tuesday night SXSW showcases traditionally lean on local talent, and gals (Akina Adderly, Amy Cook, Dana Falconberry, Ume) to guys (Nakia, Quiet Company, Zorch), that holds true here. Pick through our handicapping, however, and an international vein pops out beyond showcases for Chile, Korea, and the Netherlands. (Okay, throw Oklahoma in there, as well). UK buzz acts (Syd Arthur), Aussie breakouts (the Preatures), and Istanbul rockers (Gripin) try to elbow out some room alongside more traditional stateside acts like L.A. diva Madi Diaz. Only by getting out the rock will your voice be heard. – Raoul Hernandez



BELLA UNION

7:30pm, Central Presbyterian Church Since Scot etherealists Cocteau Twins made holy indie rock, their label spin-off Bella Union always feels comfortable in a house of worship. As such, it's mostly ladies night: female-fronted bands, allwomen ensembles, and songstresses showcasing a diverse group of gals from the U.S. and abroad. Newly signed Arc Iris, fronted by former NASA researcher and Low Anthem member Jocie Adams, previews folk-influenced tracks from an April debut, with single "Whiskey Man" taking cues from her former act. Danish songwriter Agnes Obel's name might not draw a crowd stateside, but she's topped charts across Europe. Aventine, her sophomore album, is an elegant, orchestral work completely written, recorded, and produced by Obel. Manchester quartet Pins has made the European circuit as well, releasing material on its own label Haus of PINS and officially signing with Bella Union after releasing a glittery vinyl 10-inch, perfect format for its scuzzed-up glam rock. Three-piece Ballet School, the showcase closer, made dark, New Wave ripples with debut EP Boys Again. Led by Irish Rosie Blair, the Berlin-based group adds a

freshness to New Order-esque jams.

Since the foreign-language dance craze hit our shores harder than a musical tsunami, it stands to reason that some of the biggest stars from the Korean peninsula are playing a tiny club at SXSW on Tuesday. None arrive bigger than **HyunA**, the woman responsible for "Bubble Pop!" and "Ice Cream," two of the most indelible tunes to come from anyone's pop industry. Meanwhile, Jay Park offers either the Korean Usher or the Korean Bieber depending

> on how cynical you are. The hilariously lost-in-translation **Crying Nut** are a quartet that make thrashing, sneering, emo-pop, while Kiha & the Faces revel in nursery-rhyme heat-seekers, the same sort that made Bruno Mars a Super Bowlsized star. Watch videos of **NELL** sitting in a tent, wherein Kim Jong-wan shows off his honeyed voice under the stars, and even though it's in Korean, it still sounds way more earnest than Coldplay. Jambinai, the first band on, are a

bizarre, Mogwai-esque drone rock band, equipped with chugging bass and some truly queasy violin screeches. Whatever you do, don't call K-pop a one trick pony. - Luke Winkie

9:30pm, Cheer Up Charlie's Ume hits SXSW with a new fire in its belly: third LP Monuments, which dropped March 4. The Austin trio rode last album Phantoms for 200 tour stops, and true to form, they hit the road starting with the West Coast next week. Catch the massive sound of hurricane frontwoman Lauren Larson while they're contained in Austin. Abby Johnston

10pm, the Main Austin's soldier of soul has been all over the music universe since Cee Lo picked him for his team on The Voice. He came back down to Earth with an EP of original tunes, the Southern rawk and soul of Drown in the Crimson Tide. His powerful voice aims for the stars but wafts down to us folks below with emotional resonance. - Rob Cohen

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WALES/UK SHOWCASE

8pm, Latitude 30 As Scotland considers swimming away from the UK on an independence referendum, it's up to the other coast of the British Celtic fringe to stage a night of the UK's finest, curated by Radio 1 DJ Huw Stephens. Stephen Black, aka mournful popster Sweet Baboo, evokes the sealed room gloom of Cardiff in the winter, then it's a trip across the border for ambient folksters Wolf Alice, who sprung from North London's open mic scene before getting on the radar of tastemakers at Radio 1 and NME. Glasgow's Prides update the Eighties with contemporary nods to

the epic pop of Simple Minds and Psychedelic Furs, while Adio Marchant, ex of rap collective Kid British, layers dark melodies to form **Bipolar Sunshine**, which evokes early New Order. Viral sensations Jungle bring back memories of Technique and Chicago House, its double A-side debut, "Platoon/Drops," catapulting the enigmatic London b-boy duo into the stratosphere before they played a single note live. Their 2012 EP, Country Charm, was recorded in RCA's famed Studio B and boasts a forlornly lush rendition of Stephin Merritt's "When the Open Road Is Closing In." Superlative beerlight pop purveyors **Moonlight Towers** still garner spins of 2011's Day Is the New Night on SiriusXM's Underground Garage. The finely frayed Austin quartet spent much of 2013 working on the follow-up. Transplanted Nashville/Austin quartet Starlings, TN augment dark bluegrass confessionals with bracing splashes of rockabilly and punk on latest All the Good Times. Mr. Lewis & the Funeral 5 evoke a mingling of crime scene photos, stripper tassels, and whiskey breath with their gothic cabaret provocations, while another Austin mob, Yuppie Pricks, summon Gordon Gekko crossed with Jello Biafra with uproarious supply-side punk. NYC-based Japanese comic rock heroes **Peelander-Z** embraced hair metal with flying primary colors on last year's Metalander-Z. And then there's the Woggles, Georgia's finest garage rock export with a life-affirming, soul-satisfying live show. - Greg Beets

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
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OKLAHOMA SHOWCASE






SOUNDS FROM CHILE

8pm, Friends A long, narrow strip of land on the West coast of South America with the Pacific Ocean on one side and the Andes on the other, Chile boasts a varied music scene that reflects it being one of the most stable and prosperous nations on the continent. Dënver, a synth-pop duo from San Felipe, makes its U.S. debut with brand new album Fuera de Campo, which recalls American acts like Chairlift with heavy synths and the occasional melancholy folk melody. A hard rock and blues quartet in the vein of Los Lonely Boys, **Humboldt** is a vital part of the coastal Valparaíso scene. From the Chilean capital Santiago, guitarist Nano Stern mixes traditional sounds with rock and jazz for a fusion winning him fans as far away as Europe and Australia. Popular enough to play at Lollapalooza Brazil in 2013, blues

duo **Perrosky** brings a Chilean touch to American roots rock. Heavily influenced by the electronic beats of original New Wavers like Devo and Talking Heads, quartet **Tus Amigos Nuevos** adds a Latin rock aspect for something infectious and original. **Wentru**, new to Chile's indie pop scene, features dulcet male/female harmonies, heavy synthesizers, and slinky electronic beats that scream Eighties.

An alcohol-hammered Troy Prockett, 37, was arrested in January near Hudson, Mass., after his car spun out of control on Interstate 290 and he fled on foot, pursued by state troopers who followed him to a tree, which he had climbed to about 30 feet up. Playing innocent, Prockett asked if the troopers had yet "caught the guy who was driving." The driver was still loose, Prockett said, even though only one set of footprints led to the tree (but, Prockett explained, that was because the real driver was carrying him piggyback!). Finally, as firefighters were arriving to climb after him, Prockett (according to the troopers' report) "rambled on about being an owl."

PRISON BLUES

Norway's prison system is regarded as among the most inmate-friendly in the world. but convicted mass murderer Anders Breivik is still not impressed. Breivik, serving 21 years for the 2011 bomb-and-gun attacks that killed 77 people, may already enjoy amenities unheard-of for a comparable American murderer, but he sent wardens 12 demands in November, including an upgrade of his manual typewriter and his PlayStation2 (to a PS3, with better access to game selection). He also demanded that his weekly government "allowance" (equivalent of \$49) be doubled, and said if the "torture" of his living conditions is not relieved, he would be forced into a hunger strike. (Breivik threatened a similar strike in 2012, citing "inhumane" conditions such as cold coffee, lack of skin moisturizer, and insufficient butter for his bread.)

THE CONTINUING CRISIS

Following alarming reports, the Ohio attorney general's office began working with the Ohio Veterinary Medical Association in December to be vigilant for pet owners who might be commandeering their dogs' and cats' painkillers – for their own use. Worse, other reports suggested some owners were deliberately injuring their pets just to obtain the drugs.

The Super Bowl may be the "holy grail" for Las Vegas sports gambling, but outside the United States, horse-racing, soccer and, surprisingly, pro tennis dominate. Tennis provides

bettors with 19,000 matches a year (compared to 1,200 NBA games, 2,400 Major League Baseball games and fewer than 300 NFL games), with betting on 400,000 individual games and even on individual points, of which there are nearly 2.5 million, according to a January New York Times dispatch from Melbourne, Australia. In January's Australian Open, a routine fourth-round women's match between players ranked ninth and 28th in the world attracted more than \$4 million in wagers – on just the first set.

Grrrrr! 1) In Chedzoy, England, in January, the border collie spaniel Luce was "rehomed" after Royston Grimstead, 42, learned that she had chewed completely through a wheel arch on his \$120,000 Aston Martin. Said Grimstead, "[S]he had this guilty look on her face." 2) A magistrates court in Aberystwyth, Wales, convicted Ms. Rhian Jeremiah, 26, of criminal damage in January for biting into the roof of a Fiat 500 during an alcohol-fueled incident last year. Said the car's owner, "I could hear metal crunching" (but, said Jeremiah's lawyer, "not quite like" the scene in a James Bond movie featuring the character "Jaws").

When a brand-new, exhaustively itemized medical coding system debuts in October (planned long before "Obamacare," by the way), doctors will find, for example, dozens of separate numbers to describe dealings with a patient's big toe (left one, right one, with or without nail damage, blisters, abrasions, critter bites, fractures, dislocations, sprains, amputation, etc.). Among the odder listed "ori-

gins of injury," reported *The New York Times* in December, are codes for "burning water skis" and injuries incurred in opera houses, or while knitting, or as a manifestation of sibling rivalry. The current system has about 17,000 codes, but the new one totals 68,000 for diagnoses plus 87,000 for procedures.

CLOSE ENOUGH FOR GOVERNMENT WORK

Clare Lally, weary of her three-flight front walk, demanded a wheelchair ramp on her government-subsidized house in Duntocher, England, for her daughter, 7, who has suffered from bulbar palsy since birth, and the West Dunbartonshire Council came through promptly. A front-yard-dominating concrete platform was built in January (costing the equivalent of \$67,000), consisting of a 10-level "snake"-style series of ramps with steel railings. Not only does navigating the "snake" take time, but Lally now complains that the ramp has been taken over by neighborhood kids as a skateboard run.

SMOOTH REACTIONS

Higher-Intellect Confrontations: 1) Following an evening of heavy drinking, according to police in Russia's Sverdlovsk region in January, a former schoolteacher, 52, was charged with fatally stabbing his host, 67, during a dispute over whether poetry or prose is the more important literary form. 2) One Russian man shot another (nonfatally, with rubber bullets) in the town of Rostov-on-Don in September in an argument over theories of German philosopher Immanuel Kant. 3) Nadja Svenson, 22, was charged on Christmas Eve in Londonderry, N.H. (a night with clear skies, apparently), with stabbing her father in the chest during bickering over the position of the Big Dipper.

PERSPECTIVE

The lukewarm prosecution of two Steubenville (Ohio) High football players for an August 2012 rape was foundering until Internet hacker Deric Lostutter, 26, raised the incident's profile, but now Lostutter faces a vindictive prosecution and the possibility he could serve a prison sentence five times longer than the wrist-slap detention the now-convicted rapists served. When Lostutter took interest, many Steubenville students and residents had been hoping to quiet the case or even blame the victim, but (according to November reporting by Rolling Stone) apparently one Steubenville High official managed to convince the FBI that Lostutter's hacking of the official's personal emails was a greater national threat than the rapes and provoked a SWAT raid on Lostutter's modest farmhouse. (Besides the football players, the city's school superintendent was indicted for tampering with evidence and three other officials for false statements and failing to report child abuse.)

As revealed here last week, Mayor Pro Tem Sheryl Cole's office is presenting a resolution at City Council today (March 6), asking the city manager to help facilitate a push for a soccer stadium and MLS team in Austin. See the text of that resolution, plus an Austin Aztex letter in support, with this column online. In explaining the resolution, Cole said: "We have become a global city and soccer is an international sport that fosters diversity, health, and team play. As our city supports these values, we should be involved in determining the feasibility of this effort. The city should take the lead in bringing together stakeholders such as the **University of Texas**, the Aztex, Major League Soccer, neighborhoods, and others during the planning process."

For now, everyone seems to be pulling together on this: the city, the Aztex, the Austin FC effort headed by Michael Wilt, and, so far, the public. You can show your support on the recently posted www.facebook.com/mlsaustin page, which seems to be adding likes at the rate of about one a minute.

The most interesting response I got came from an Italian journalist who called within three hours after the paper hit the streets, to see if the city of Rome's newly-announced fiscal crisis was going to have an effect on the proposed AS Roma stadium being forwarded by Raptor Accelerator Austin, and saying he had asked around at AS Roma, and the club didn't deny interest in there being an MLS team in Austin. Hmmm.

All that hoopla pushed other soccer news right out of the column last week, but, rest assured, the ball keeps turning: As we go to press, Wednesday, March 5, is the first day of international games of the year, and national teams around the world started their runup to this summer's World Cup. The U.S. lost 2-0 to Ukraine, in a game moved to Cyprus from Kharkiv, Ukraine, a pro-Russian city barely 10 miles from the Russian border, where some of the nation's most violent political protests have been occurring. Elsewhere, England beat Denmark, 1-0, and Spain beat Italy, 1-0, in a rematch of the 2010 WC final... Jack Sisemore's RV Muse-

um in Amarillo is a timeline of America on the move. The story of recreational vehicles started simple and became a tale of ever-increasing luxury.

someone thought of packing his camping gear in a trailer, and he was ready to head to the lake at a drop of a red and white bobber. Then his wife told him to put a tent on top of the trailer with a commode inside, and the recreational vehicle was horn

The museum follows the evolution of RVs from a 1921 Kampcar on a Model T chassis to the first Winnebago Itasca. Along the way we visit pop-up tents, shiny Airstreams, a VW microbus with a peace symbol, and a 1948 bus that was a movie star. South by Southwest Film Festival 2014

From star-studded world premieres to scrappy microindies, the 21st edition of the South by Southwest Film Festival screens more than 100 feature films and scores of short films over the course of nine days. See our special SXSW Film preview supplement in this issue for interviews with participating filmmakers, and look for more interviews, reviews, red-carpet photos, and tips for attending (Tip No. 1: Don't forget to turn clocks forward on Saturday night - so much to do and one hour less to do it) at austinchronicle.com/sxsw/film.

Tips for Austin locals: It's not necessary to purchase a badge in order to partake in the film screenings. Film wristbands - good for the entire festival - are available at Waterloo Records and Austin-area Alamo Drafthouses. The wristbands have replaced what in past years was called the Film Pass, and only get you into the screenings and not the conference panels. Space permitting, individual tickets will be sold at every screening; note that SXXpress pass holders get in first, followed by badge holders, then wristband wearers, and finally single-ticket holders. SXSW has a very informative page, which you can find at www.sxsw.com/film/screenings/access, that details everything you need to know about attending the screenings - from how the lineups work to when you should arrive.

Be smart about your selections. The best chances of getting into screenings using a single-admission ticket are going to be at the larger venues – which include the Paramount Theatre, the Vimeo Theater at the Austin

Convention Center, and the Topfer Theatre at ZACH. The film crowds also thin out a little bit once the SXSW Music Festival gets underway midweek, so aiming to attend a film's second or third screening might work better than targeting its debut screening.

Another tip that not everyone realizes is that it's also possible to enjoy the SXSW Film Festival without ever going Downtown. The Alamo Drafthouse Village and Alamo Drafthouse Slaughter Lane are both designated as satellite screening locations, and are at a remove from the Downtown commotion. Every location also has a venue status board, which provides up-to-date info about the line status. Red means full, vellow means hurry, and green means go. The status boards are also available when you're out and about via the SXSW Go mobile app. You can build your schedule on the app and sync it with your mobile devices, as well as get status boards and other timely info.

Ultimately, there's only so much you can glean from online tools, capsule descriptions, and Chronicle suggestions. You need to don your explorer caps and go forth armed with information, instincts, and gut feelings, Enjoy,

300: RISE OF AN EMPIRE

D: Noam Murro; with Sullivan Stapleton, Eva Green, Lena Headey, Rodrigo Santoro, David Wenham, Andrew Tiernan. (R, 102 min.)

Less of a sequel than the second, meanwhile-back-at-the-farm half of Zack Snyder's 2007 blockbuster 300, this is a righteously gory and spectacularly imagined entry into what is almost certain to be a major studio franchise for years to come. It outmaneuvers that other recent Aegean "epic" - Pompeii in every department. Even with its relatively brief running time, 300: Rise of an Empire suddenly makes genuine Hollywood historical epics like The Ten Commandments and Ben-Hur seem tame by comparison. (Not that I'm knocking William Wyler's Ben-Hur, mind you.) There's 300 times more bloodshed, battles, rough sex, and even rougher weather here than in Snyder's original film, and director Murro keeps what feels like an umpteen number of amphoras spinning simultaneously. Amazingly, it all coheres into a ripping good yarn, awash in spurting gobbets of not only testosterone but, this time out, a heaping, scheming helping of estrogen as well.

That would be Eva Green's fearless and cunning Artemisia, the leader of the Persian fleet. Cloaked in warrior-noir leather couture, she's hellbent on attacking the Greeks' watery flanks even as "the 300" are going gloriously to their fabled deaths on the other side of the as-yet-unified country. As the Greek General Themistokles (Stapleton) attempts to unite his country's various factions into joining the fray - one in which the Grecian navy is wildly outmatched by the Persians - Headey's narration guickly and thoroughly provides just the right amount of exposition to bring the audience up to speed on what most of us dozed through in our high school history classes.

Suffice it to say, Artemisia holds a death grudge against Themistokles. Greece's "farmers, poets, sculptors" and everymen are pressed into service to valiantly, and perhaps hopelessly, repel the Persian warships. Virtually everybody gets a limb hacked off, at the very least, or an arrow in the eveball.

Director Murro is completely up to the task of replicating the inspired and flawless melding of CGI chaos and live-action melees into an utterly believable whole. As with Snyder's original, Rise of an Empire has a mythic, dreamlike

quality to it - fitting, given the subject matter. Slow-motion slaughter rarely looks as artful as it does here, and the digitally-rendered fleets, pitching to and fro atop a madman's sea, might well render viewers as queasy as their onscreen counterparts, especially when viewed on an IMAX screen (which is, obviously, recommended for this particular film). Murro and cinematographer Simon Duggan also make judicious and occasionally flinch-worthy use of 3-D, as when the Persians lay a trap for the unwitting Greeks via flaming arrows or when whitecaps are made black by oil.

While very much a "hard R" movie, Rise of an Empire is, nevertheless, the perfect sort of film for rainy weekend afternoons. It's a spectacle right down to its shattered ships and duplicitous warcraft, and this time out the story's been leavened and enlivened with plenty of old-school girl power. Now how about those Argonauts, already?

GRAND PIANO

Like the notoriously difficult musical composition that serves as its elegantly anxious heartbeat, Grand Piano is a manic feast for the senses. Fantastic Fest favorite Eugenio Mira summons visual and aural leitmotifs that recall everyone from Dario Argento and Brian De Palma to Alfred Hitchcock and Stravinsky's riotous debut of The Rite of Spring. The film's title is more than apt; everything about the film is grand - Unax Mendía's snaking cinematography, Javier Alvariño's sumptuous production design, and, above all, Víctor Reyes' thrilling score. Nearly the entire film takes place within a single, theatrical setting, but Mira, working from Damien Chazelle's equally streamlined catand-mouse screenplay, makes this relatively small film seem, indeed, grand.

Wood plays the high-strung, virtuoso pianist Tom Selznick who, five years prior to the events in this film, went through a meltdown onstage while attempting an "impossible to play" composition by his late mentor. Returning to the keys for a concert honoring

said mentor, Selznick is already jittery without the added pressure brought on by the presence of his beloved, superstar actress wife (Bishé), whose own fame threatens to overshadow his return from self-imposed exile. It's only when he takes his place on the stage that he realizes - via crimson-scrawled directives hidden within his score - that there's a laser-scoped assassin somewhere in the audience. This time Selznick is playing for both his life and that of his wife.

Grand Piano's plot may sound familiar (it recalls the 2002 thriller Phone Booth and Dario Argento's Opera, for starters), but Mira's protagonist holds it together seamlessly, up to a point. The timbre and tone is one of relentless suspense, and Wood's slight frame and intense gaze are perfectly suited to the role. It's only in the final third of the film that things begin to fall apart, literally, as the unseen assailant's plans go awry and Selznick is loosed from the keyboard to go hand-to-hand amid the catwalks and rigging high above the stage.

There are moments of spellbinding, inventive beauty, too, as when Selznick's wife serenades her husband (and the packed house) with a melancholy rendition of "Motherless Child," thus giving the pianist time to seek out his antagonist. And, again, Unax Mendía, returning from Mira's 2010 film Agnosia, whips the camera into a frenzy - mirroring the mounting suspense hanging like a pall over the concert house. That it all ends on a somewhat flat, false note is less a failure of the filmmakers than it is a testament to a certain amount of overzealousness in the screenplay - which, of course, echoes the nail-gnawing tension unfolding onscreen. Bravo!

MR. PEABODY & SHERMAN

D: Rob Minkoff; with Ty Burrell, Max Charles, Ariel Winter, Leslie Mann, Stephen Colbert, Allison Janney, Stephen Tobolowsky, Stanley Tucci, Lake Bell, Mel Brooks, Patrick Warburton. (PG. 91 min.)

That unflappable, time-traveling, genius dog Mr. Peabody and his adopted human son Sherman first popped up on TV in the early Sixties as interstitial entertainment on The Rocky and Bullwinkle Show. Dog and boy have since come a long way from the original's crude animation - and even cruder treatment of historical figures like Geronimo. This zippy new picture from DreamWorks Animation embraces a more socially progressive mindset, elevates the Cartoon Scatology Imperative by hooking it to alternative fuel and Trojanhorse humor, and thumbs a nose at the lowest-common-denominator culture to - egads! - celebrate a brainiac. What a charmer.

Directed by Rob Minkoff and evidencing the same deftness at macro adventure and micro emotional beats he displayed in The Lion King and the Stuart Little movies, Mr. Peabody & Sherman catches newbies up right away by charting Peabody's beginnings as an unadoptable stray - because what little boy wants to take home a puppy who cites Plato as reason not to play fetch? - and his meteoric rise as "valedogtorian" at Harvard, a scientist, and self-professed inventor of the fist bump. Eventually, the stray adopts one of his own, young Sherman, and together they romp through time and space in the Wayback Machine. In a lovely little grace note that mimics Up's marriage montage, we see Sherman's childhood unfurl against a historical backdrop that co-stars George Washington, Gandhi, and baby Moses in a basket, gliding by as Peabody teaches Sherman how to swim.

As befits a movie about (in part) time travel, the story (scripted by Craig Wright) doesn't unfold in a linear fashion. There are flashbacks; present-day jaunts to France on the precipice of the Reign of Terror, ancient Egypt, and da Vinci's Renaissance; a quick trip to the future; and one mighty rip in the time-space continuum. After so many paint-by-number narratives in animation, Mr. Peabody & Sherman's fizzy feeling of discombobulation is nothing short of delightful. (The puns are pretty terrific, too.) Historians may blanch at the liberties taken here (and Jefferson would surely lift an eyebrow at Washington filching his "we hold these truths to be self-evident" line), but the spirit of the thing - the way it champions intellectual curiosity and critical thinking - warmed this nerd's heart tremendously.



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

Soon he is smuggling the Mexican drugs across the border and seizes on the idea of a buyers club to redistribute the drugs to other Texans in need. Thus begins Woodroof's transformation from goner to survivor, and from homophobe to roughedged humanist. Like The Little Mermaid, this animated film mines Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tales for material, discards the most brutish bits, and applies a heavy Disney top gloss. Frozen doesn't benefit from the above comparison (it ranks a distant second), but the film can count in its favor visual grandeur, two energetic young women as co-leads, and a couple of aboveaverage plot twists. Screenwriter/co-director Jennifer Lee hooks an empowerment story around two fire-andice siblings - eldest Elsa (voiced by Menzel), who can control snow, and Anna (Bell), a blithe chatterbox who is unaware of her sister's powers until Elsa accidentally plunges their tiny Nordic kingdom into endless winter. When Elsa self-banishes to a hermetic life on top of a mountain, li'l sis chases after her, bringing along an anti-social ice merchant (Groff) and a sweet, dim, sentient snowman, whose spirit - pure of heart, noble in intention – carries throughout the film. O LONE SURVIVOR

Combat has rarely been depicted in films with the intensity conveyed in writer/director Peter Berg's Lone Survivor, which tracks a military operation that went horribly wrong. Based on a book published by the mission's lone survivor Marcus Luttrell (played by Mark Wahlberg), Lone Survivor is a somber celebration of courage that steers clear of jingoism and moral judgment. In 2005, four members of SEAL Team 10 - accompanying Luttrell are Michael Murphy (Kitsch), Danny Dietz (Hirsch), and Matt Axelson (Foster) - were dropped into northern Afghanistan with the aim of taking out a particular Taliban leader. But, before long, the SEALs are surrounded by armed Taliban fighters, and the film spares nothing in showing the fragility of flesh as the team fights for survival. Without taking sides or glorifying its subjects, Lone Survivor depicts a real band of brothers who put their bodies on the line even as their mission fails. (01/10/2014)

Long Walk to Freedom venerates a man, not a movement, often ignoring the contributions of others in favor of more single-minded hero worship. Fassbender, too, is a revelation as Northup's monstrous, pathetic master, Edwin Epps, and newcomer Nyong'o exhibits a masterful balance of strength and frailty as the waifish female slave Patsey. Painterly and evocative, with a penchant for long, unflinching tableaux, director McQueen tackles profound despair, heartbreak, and horror ... and yet you can't look away. 12 Years a Slave is a movie for the ages. WALKING WITH DINOSAURS

The film is crammed to bursting with arresting imagery, youthful idealism, and a sense of impending, elegiac loss of the Japan of Horikoshi's youth to the unyielding tides of soon-to-be bloodstained history. In Martin Scorsese's latest take on the American hoodlum - a species the filmmaker returns to time and again - the thugs wield not guns and cudgels but telephones and the art of the hard sell. Based on the memoirs of Jordan Belfort, The Wolf of Wall Street chronicles this young stockbroker's life of excess - drugs, women, schemes - until his downfall at the hand of a dogged FBI agent, and his later re-emergence as a promotional speaker. As Belfort, Leonardo DiCaprio delivers some of the finest work of his career - crazed, funny, imperious, and possessed. While what's onscreen is never uninteresting, its unrelentingness is exhausting. Starting with all knobs cranked up to 11 and never loosening its grip, The Wolf of Wall Street matches its subject's excesses to a stupefying extent. All should be well if you just remember to buckle up your jet pack before launch. (12/20/2013)

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
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2013/2014 Austin Music Awards

I have not come to bury Cleopatra but to praise her.

After staging some 30 years of Grammy-like prize nights, Austin Music Awards director Margaret Moser retires after one last ball on Wednesday (see "Passionate Kiss," p.78). That's akin to Lorne Michaels stepping down from *Saturday Night Live*. Pull out all the stops? By definition.

Unannounced musical guests? No question, including a last-minute FOB, friend of Bruce (Springsteen). All-star tributes to Moser? If only you'd seen the string of local musicians that passed through my inbox two weeks ago. Awards? Austin never saw Song of the Year coming, trust me. Promised is a night Lucinda Williams herself made sure to headline since she and Moser practically invented "kindred spirits." Their rise to define Austin music – one and the same.

Today's Texas Tornados (Augie Meyers, Flaco Jimenez, Shawn Sahm, etc.) remain the keepers of Doug Sahm's

eternal flame, so Moser flashes back to a ground zero of ATX music. Organist Dr. James Polk painted the Eastside purple when Moser boarded the freshly birthed *Austin Chronicle* in the early Eighties, and in native tenor saxman Elias Haslanger's Church on Monday combo, chitlun circuit funk survives. Lest nostalgia deem itself the guest of honor, the Jon Dee Grahams, Will and Charlie Sextons, and Sara Hickmans of tomorrow grant their parents special guest status when the Youngbloods Choir demonstrates which local acts of SXSW 2020 will walk off with an armload at the AMAs.

Margaret, who retires from the *Chronicle* in May, drew me in and cemented me to this publication in 1992. Barbara Crampton was the password, the secret handshake. *Re-Animator?* Yes, but lop off those first two letters and that's Margaret Moser in a word.

RENT YOUR PLACE DURING SXSW?

Tempted to rent your place during SXSW and make quick money? You aren't the only one — the combination of SXSW revelers and limited hotel rooms means the chance to cash in by renting space at sky-high prices. But before you do, it's important to remember that the city of Austin recently revised the ordinances that regulate the practice of short-term rentals (STRs). Owners of STRs, defined by the city as the rental of a residential unit or accessory building for less than 30 consecutive days, must obtain an operating license. Here's the answer to a few common questions regarding STRs and the licensing process:

I rent mu apartment in Central Austin. I can pay for three months of my rent by renting the apartment for one week during SXSW. Can I rent it?

No. City of Austin regulations require that only property owners be allowed to apply for an STR license. Said another way, if you are currently a tenant (not the owner), you are not eligible for an STR license to rent the apartment under the city's program.

I own my home and have rented it for SXSW for the last five years. I understand the city now regulates short-term rentals. But because I've been doing it for several years, doesn't that mean I'm grandfathered and don't have to register with the city?

No. Under the city's new rules, you must apply for a license to participate in the STR program even if you've rented your place for SXSW (or other events) in the past

How do I get an STR license?

Fill out and submit an application with the city. You will have to pay \$285 in fees. You will also need to provide proof of property insurance, payment of hotel occupancy taxes, and a valid certificate of occupancy. The city also requires that you post your STR license numbers, the operating license, and the STR information packet in the rental property.

Be sure to read all of the city's STR regulations (www.austintexas.gov/str) if you are thinking about renting your place on a short-term basis.




