

'Chronicle' Endorsements

Here are the Chronicle editorial board's endorsements for the May 27 party primary runoffs. There are only two races on the Democratic side, and we're between a rock and a hard place on one of those. We make no recommendations on the GOP side; when David Dewhurst starts looking good by comparison, it's time to punt. See more info at austinchronicle.com/election.

U.S. SENATE: DAVID ALAMEEL

Taking out incumbent Republican John Cornyn will be a tough challenge. While in the first round we felt that El Paso-based civil rights attorney Maxey Scherr had the better political skills, on the differing battleground of the primary we endorse Dallas-based dental tycoon and philanthropist David Alameel. While relatively politically inexperienced, he has the deep pockets to take on Cornyn. And he's far better than opponent Kesha Rogers, a Houston-based DINO (Democrat in Name Only), Lyndon LaRouche supporter whose constant comparisons of President Obama to Hitler are tasteless, demeaning to the electoral process, and just plain nuts.

AGRICULTURE COMMISSIONER: NO ENDORSEMENT

Sad times for Democrats. Finally, they have two solid candidates - Sens. Wendy Davis and Leticia Van de Putte – at the top of the ticket, but that's counterbalanced by raw incompetence in this race. On one side, huckster and

self-publicist Kinky Friedman. On the other, insurance agent Jim Hogan.

Neither has any political skills or actual experience. Both seem to be in this race either as hobbvists, or for pure ego. There's an argument (see below) that Friedman is a useful idiot, who will at least keep the discussion of pot legalization alive in the upcoming months. But the Dems

need real candidates for this vital office, not one-note placard wavers. It's a wash, and one more Dem cycle in the wilderness. - News Staff

AGRICULTURE COMMISSIONER: KINKY FRIEDMAN

The fact of the matter is, a Republican (Sid Miller or Tommy Merritt) will be elected in the fall. Also running will be either Kinky or Jim Hogan, who's declining to campaign at all. If Kinky is nominated, he'll travel around the state for five months, talking about our failed pot prohibition policy, apparently his chosen issue, and because he's Kinky, it'll get press, and response. And if Hogan is nominated, there won't be a campaign at all. I don't have to be a big admirer of Kinky Friedman to prefer one outcome to the other. - Nick Barbaro

"While I'm excited to see a firmer vision of rail in Austin, I would argue that the current plan devised by Project Connect and ostensibly to be placed before voters, is not expensive enough nor extensive enough. This ballot initiative will be in front of the entire city of Austin, yet the plan only serves a portion of the city. And some of the proposed rail routes serve residents-to-be, like those coming to future developments along the Airport Boulevard/ Highland area. Why not propose a plan that lays out a simple web of rail lines across the city that nearly everyone would be within a mile or two of, say it will cost \$5 billion (half paid by federal government), and take 10-15 years to complete? 

The reason for this public alert is the fact that it is a drain on the resources of the first responders and emergency rooms - in other words - money. They do seem to prioritize care of the people who are at the ARCH using these drugs or they would clean it up by arresting them or referring them to substance abuse

treatment (which is not perfect and also costs money), but these are human beings who often suffer from dual diagnoses of mental illness and the disease of addiction. And, yes, addiction is a disease. It is recognized as such by the AMA and meets all of the criteria of a disease. which are that it is primary, progressive, chronic or permanent, and fatal if untreated. I'm sure after this blows over it will be business as usual at the ARCH again until people are back in the ERs in droves.



Campaign Summer Fun

On the road to 10–1, races begin to take shape

What a difference a day makes.

That's true in politics as in romance, as I learned again Tuesday afternoon. No sooner had I updated the *Chronicle*'s master list of mayoral and City Council candidates, current as of that morning – when three more candidates filed campaign

treasurer designations. (As soon as I escape Wednesday's press deadline, I'll return to that task.) By rough and certainly transitory count, that makes 52 semi-official Council candidates -CTDs are only the first step, as *official* filing for the offices doesn't begin until July 21 - with another half-dozen likely to declare in the next few days. (See "The Road to 10-1 ... Is Getting Crowded," on our Elections page, austinchronicle.com/elections.)

Add the four *semi*-official mayoral candidates – and a likely fifth, Mayor Pro Tem Sheryl Cole, apparently ready to declare any day now – and we've got a cornucopia of

would-be public officials in the Austin mix, certainly a testimony to the citywide energy unleashed by the new single-member district system. As I've written before, the more the merrier – it's undeniably a good thing that more folks become engaged with our municipal issues, although I

also hope that the turnout of November voters will be at least proportional, in each district, to the number of balloted candidates.

We might well find over time that the shift from spring to fall – and from perhaps 40,000 to 200,000 voters – has a more profound effect on our local politics than the districting system itself. In this first round, because of the sheer number of potential candi-

dates, the shift is almost certain to result in mid-December run-offs in several races – and the distinct possibility that those much smaller run-offs could devolve into the same old neighborhoods and voters determining the final outcomes.

Patterns Emerge

It's still very early, and candidates have just begun holding "kick-offs" of one kind or another in consort with the start of the fundraising season on May 8. But a few things are being established. At the mayoral level, relatively unknown Steve Adler is defining himself as the bearer of a "New Way Forward" - ostensibly different from City Hall business-as-usual – and hoping to parlay his background as a civil rights and property attorney and philanthropist into a broad coalition of voters. Adler holds the advantage - and disadvantage - of having no immediate political record, the precisely opposite situation of Council Member Mike Martinez, who must both run on, and defend, his eight-year tenure on Council. (Presumably, the same will be true for

- Heavy rains and a cold snap interrupted the push toward summertime this week, and brought perhaps a couple of days of slightly higher water to the Highland Lakes, still suffering from years of drought.
- On Monday, a Travis County grand jury indicted former APD detective Charles Kleinert on manslaughter charges in the fatal shooting of Larry Eugene Jackson Jr. Kleinert was released on personal bond shortly after turning himself in to the Travis County Justice Center. - APD officer Robert Krummel, however, was cleared by a grand jury Tuesday. In October 2012, then-Coyote Ugly employee Gwen Daniels accelerated through Sixth Street, striking multiple pedestrians while fleeing an unruly crowd. Concerned about safety, Krummel fired at the car's windshield four times. Daniels was uninjured.
- In response to the drunken Sixth Street swell, new parking restrictions go into effect today along Sixth Street between Red River and Brazos. The new rules will restrict parking between 9pm and 3am Thursdays through Sundays.
- Mary Ann Barclay, an Austin lesbian who made waves in her effort to be ordained by the United Methodist Church, was denied recommendation by the Southwest Annual Texas Conference Tuesday. UMC's Book of Discipline bars "self-avowed practicing homosexuals" from ordination a policy Barclay's home church, University United Methodist, says is discriminatory.
- On Tuesday, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals granted a stay of execution scheduled that evening in the case of Robert Campbell, ruling that he had not been given sufficient opportunity to present evidence that he is mentally retarded and therefore ineligible for capital punishment.
- Attorney General Greg Abbott is busy on the campaign trail, but not too busy to defend Texas' gerrymandering and voter ID laws. Last week he challenged subpoenas in two different courts that would require lawmakers to hand over emails relating to potential voter suppression.
- An embarrassing weekend for UT's football program, after precisely zero Longhorns were drafted by the NFL. The only headlines the program garnered were spurred by outrage at quarterback Case McCoy for tweeting "ESPN ... You serious right now?" in response to Michael Sam kissing his boyfriend after being picked by the St. Louis Rams.

Cole.) We're still learning about newcomers Todd Phelps and Randall Stephens, largely outside those traditional public policy circles altogether.

In the Council races, the sheer numbers are daunting. Although some of these folks appear to be wide-eyed hobbyists, apparently convinced that running for Council is as easy as block-walking in the Texas summer sun, quite a few grassroots activists should have a better handle on the real work involved. Three of the "minority voter opportunity" districts (1, 3, 4) are burgeoning with candidates of varying credentials - and the other, District 2, is currently a strong match between former firefighter and assistant attorney general Delia Garza with small-businessman and Dove Springs advocate Edward Reyes.

District 3 features 10 announced candidates, including the long-simmering intrafamilia battle between PODER's Susana Almanza and her brother, Cesar Chavez neighborhood advocate Sabino "Pio" Renteria. District 4 also lists 10 candidates, including several veteran community activists - and merits a rare shout-out to former candidate Chelsea Brass who, when she learned another candidate (Katrina Daniel) shared a quite similar background and policy positions, bowed out and endorsed her opponent. (Brass might be too sensible to be a politician.)

District 9 (central city) matches the only two Council incumbents (Chris Riley and Kathie Tovo), plus newcomer Erin McGann; and the far west races (6, 8, and 10), in these officially nonpartisan campaigns, include several Republicans who will make the not unreasonable argument that City Hall "diversity" should be political as well as ethnic. We'll see.


Apple Pie

Early on, there's less to distinguish candidates on the "issue" scale, as nearly everyone has been citing variations on "affordability, traffic, water, public safety, education" as the themes he or she is most likely to focus on in the coming campaign. "Throwing out the bums" at City Hall will certainly be a subtext, although the recent Zandan poll indicating Austinites are, on the whole, fairly satisfied with their city might somewhat diminish that emphasis (although satisfied people are, lamentably, the ones least likely to vote). I won't embarrass by name - yet - one candidate who announced last week that he will seek to lower property taxes, hire more police officers, and acquire more parks for his district, because he's far from the only wouldbe council member who will promise to deliver that magic act from the dais.

I do recommend that candidates spend a good deal of time watching incumbent council members wrestle with the Fiscal Year 2015 budget, as they attempt to lower property taxes, hire more police officers, and maintain city parks, libraries, and social services. I promise: It ain't as easy as blockwalking in the Texas summer sun.

Water Talk Bubbles Forth

EXPLORING THE FUTURE OF AUSTIN'S WATER SUPPLY



mittee - is a treasured rule of thumb here in Austin, as in most other growing cities. And if there's one thing about which there is increasing uncertainty at this juncture, it's water. Where will it come from? How much will we need? No, try that one again. How much will we really need?

The only thing we know for sure is that the drought is killing us. Enter the newly formed Water Resource Planning Task Force, which the City Council has created in response to several factors: climate change, the looming prospect of rural-vs.-urban water wars breaking out across Texas as municipalities seek to fortify supplies, and concerns formally voiced by environmental groups (namely Austin Sierra Club. Clean Water Action. Environment Texas, and Save Our Springs Alliance) about a lack of inclusiveness in Austin Water Utility's "integrated water resource planning."

And finally, as the Council resolution sponsored by Kathie Tovo, Chris Riley, and Mayor Pro Tem Sheryl Cole makes clear, the task force is needed to examine whether the utility's exploratory water-shopping trips outside of Austin could have unintended consequences, such as "substantial rate increases" to customers.

The 11-member task force is charged with evaluating and coming up with recommendations on future water planning as well as

es, such as conservation, reuse, "regional transmission systems and partnerships," groundwater, and aquifer storage. They're also expected to craft a set of recommendations that are consistent with the long-term Imagine Austin plan.

THINK REGIONALLY

To date, the panel has held two long meetings; task force members - all of them are thankfully well-versed in water policy and sustainability issues - are trying to pack a lot into each meeting within a narrow window of time. They're expected to deliver their findings and recommendations to Council no later than June 20. The panel also has impressive leadership; its chair and co-chair, respectively, are Sharlene Leurig, who oversees the water program division of national nonprofit Ceres, and Tom Mason, a former general manager of the Lower Colorado **River Authority**.

It's unusual for a citizens' task force to draw widespread attention, but we're talking water, so it's not surprising that people from outside of Austin are following these meetings closely, and they've urged the task force to pursue its mission with a regional consciousness. At the committee's orientation

meeting on May 5, about 10 people showed up to speak during Citizens Communication, including several from Bastrop and Lee counties, where folks are battling to protect and preserve groundwater from the Carrizo-Wilcox Aquifer, currently a hot commodity in some circles.

NOT FROM HEAVEN

Blanco County resident John Watson, a retired attorney, shared some of his own concerns as a property owner. His home in Blanco sits on the banks of the

Watson told the task force, had dried up five days earlier. He said he also owns property in Bastrop County, next door to the Lost Pines Boy

to be negotiating to sell its water rights to the LCRA. "The LCRA will not tell me what they want to do with that water," he lamented, adding that he fears such a water sale might also drain the water

Scout Camp, which happens

beneath his property. Watson then digressed a bit to address a lack of foresight going into Central Texas' population boom. "Population is driven by policy - it's not a thing that descends out of heaven onto us." (That of course runs counter to the mantra of key policymakers and the local Chamber - that growth is happening whether we want it or not, so we need to get these apartments and subdivisions built fast, cheap, and ugly. But that's an altogether different digression.) "We have an opportunity to guide the population growth, and you are key to doing that," Watson said. "I urge you to consider those of us who live and own property outside the city. Please consider the sources from which your water could come," he said, referring to utility officials' discussions of potential groundwater purchases from the Carrizo-Wilcox, "because the people who live [there] would be impacted."

The task force's next meeting is May 19. ■


Council: Fire, Flood, and Men on Horseback

Sued if you do, sued if you don't. That looks like the choice facing City Council at today's meeting, Thursday, May 15, whatever they decide on Item 10 of their agenda: "Approve a settlement of claims asserted by the United States Department of Justice concerning hiring practices within the Austin Fire Department." This particular blaze has been simmering a while, and the city had delayed hiring new AFD cadets until the claims of discrimination – more specifically, "adverse impact" on minorities in the qualifying process – were reviewed the DOJ.

That review has been completed, and the DOJ did indeed find adverse impact on minority candidates, although in its consent decree now drafted for Council discussion and approval, DOJ lawyers are careful to reiterate: "The United States does not allege in its Complaint that the City engaged in intentional discrimination." In essence, the charge - and now a federal court case against the city - is that in 2012, the city used a faulty testing system on AFD applicants (and also bungled implementation in timing and scoring) such that African-American and Hispanic applicants were unfairly disadvantaged. If the city approves the consent decree, hiring resumes, some minority applicants in the queue will be hired (with back pay), and the lawsuit goes away - but the hiring process will also be effectively handed over to the DOJ for a period of four to eight years.

That latter provision sticks in the craw of the Austin Firefighters Association, which has complained before that the city appears to be using the consent decree as a way of evading good faith contract negotiations with the union. (See "Is the City Trying to Bust the Firefighters Union?" Feb. 7.) In a letter to the DOJ, union attorney Craig Deats wrote of the meetings between the parties, "Negotiations at the mediation appear to have broken down due to COA's insistence that hiring procedures not be subject to the collective bargaining process with the AFA."

The AFA points to the relative success of the 2013 hiring process – which qualified a considerable group of minority candidates (enough, it appears, to satisfy the decree), who are now awaiting the outcome of this impasse – and they've released a counterproposal, saying that there is no reason for the decree to cover post-2012 procedures:



"The 2013 process results prove that not only does the process work, it works extremely well. The successful 2013 results prove that AFA's involvement had a positive effect on the hiring process. At AFA, we see no reason to fix something that is not broken."

The union promises that members will be out in force at today's Council meeting, adding: "Should City Council vote to approve the consent decree, the Austin Firefighters Association is prepared to go to court." Negotiations may resume, but right now it looks like pick your legal poison.

Item 10, the DOJ consent decree, is listed on the consent agenda – but will inevitably be "pulled for speakers," sometime after 4pm.

Highways and Waterways

The consent decree should be a good morning's work or more, and if Council gets through that, also expect a good deal of deliberation over Item 22, a resolution reiterating the city's ongoing opposition to the construction of **SH 45** (aka the "Aquifer Highway") and – since the city's options to stop the project are fairly limited – asking staff to do what it can to propose alternatives. The resolution (proposed by CMs Laura Morrison and Kathie Tovo) invokes the Endangered Species Act and the Balcones Canyonlands Conservation Plan and asks staff to report back within 90 days

with any progress.

A set of three resolutions, carried by CM **Chris Riley.** would step the city's toes into the ever-vexed question of taxi services Downtown - more specifically, trying to engage the latest trend in ridesharing apps or "Transportation Networking Companies" (Uber, Lyft, and the like) without upsetting the economic applecarts of existing cab companies and their drivers. The overarching problem is the imbalance of supply and demand: At peak times or during big events, they're aren't enough cabs (or other vehicles-for-hire) to go around, but at non-peak times, there are barely enough riders to keep drivers in groceries and companies in business. Beyond that, ridesharing raises all sorts of issues of insurance, liability, etc., and Council's previous forays into this territory haven't been terribly successful, beyond maintaining the inadequate status quo while illegal and unregulated services proliferate.

Some of those questions were raised at Tuesday's work session, and Riley acknowledged that nobody has the answers yet, even nationally. His Items 24-26 represent another attempt to address this issue – initially through the peak time scarcity – and see if staff can propose some solutions.

Also among Council resolutions is **Mike Martinez**'s proposal to find additional money to fund buyouts of the remaining

endangered (or already flooded) homes in the **Onion Creek** flood plain. Over the years, federal support has been slow, even while new maps drew more homes into the flood plain; last fall's disastrous flood confirmed the danger, and Martinez's resolution asks staff to find funding options, with the suggestion that a 75-cent bump in the city's drainage fee would raise enough money to buy out the remaining 142 homes still unaccounted for. If approved, the resolution would move that discussion (and any other options staff can find) into the budget process for further consideration.

Too much water on one end of town, too little water on the other: Also returning today is the much-postponed public hearing on revisions in the Lake Austin shorefront zoning regulations.

Money Matters

Meanwhile, annual budget presentations and preparations proceed, with Council a bit annoyed in early work-session discussions at changes in the procedures coming out of the Budget Office at the direction of City Manager Marc Ott. A couple of members made it plain that they weren't happy with Ott's all-caps "pronouncement" to budget staff - "NO INCREASE IN THE PROPERTY TAX RATE" - not because they necessarily want to raise the rate (nobody's yet proposed that), but because any such changes, up or down, are strictly Council's policy purview. Beyond that, CMs also bristled at Ott's unilateral decision this budget cycle not to have department heads compile their "unmet needs" lists: the annual wish list of what citizens request and departments would like to provide ... if they only had the money.

Again, based on recent discussions (and election season), Council is unlikely to be in a spending mood – but they'd still like to know what they're doing without, and beyond that, some members believe Ott is increasingly drifting into Council policy territory. Accordingly, an unmet needs list is now in preparation.

Nevertheless, the Austin Police Department budget tends to roll perennially on, outside the boundaries of that particular minefield, with ever-expanding budget requests and only Lonesome Bill Spelman to stick his foot in the roadway. In the initial budget presentations (also much less detailed than in previous years), Spelman noted that APD's new-funds request, at \$12.4 million, represents more than half of the \$23 million increase in the overall General Funds budget, and that he would be expecting the department to justify all that additional money. By his own acknowledgment, Spelman's tug-of-war over the APD budget has become "ritual" over the years, and despite all his Proliferating PowerPoints, the police budget keeps expanding. On the other end of the rope, APD Chief Art Acevedo points to an everexpanding Austin population and shrugs, "We need more police officers."

POOR PLANNING

The city **Planning Commission** had a painful evening Tuesday, with the lion's share of its agenda taken up by three separate zoning cases in which city staff had issued permits for construction that should not have been allowed, and was now recommending **zoning changes** to accommodate the **illegal construction**. If you're keeping score, the PC recommended approval of two of the zoning changes, denial of one – on reasonable grounds – but the broader questions lingered, as voiced in frustration by Commissioner **Danette Chimenti**: Why is the city issuing permits for projects that clearly violate such basic principles as **impervious cover limits** and **building setbacks**? Why, indeed, are certified architects and engineers even submitting such plans that they have to know aren't up to code?

And when "mistakes are made," what's the proper remedy? To whom does the city have greater responsibility: the property owner who says, "You told me it was OK to pave over this area; I've got the permit right here," or the one who says, "My whole yard floods every time it rains because you let this guy build an illegal parking area uphill from me"?

It is from such petty disputes as this that city policy is forged. But indeed, it was hard to tell what policy was being promoted Tuesday night. Are development applications to be scrutinized more carefully? Are applicants and their professional representatives to be discouraged from submitting obviously deficient plans, with hopes that they'll get through **Development Review** with a nod or a wink, and then be grandfathered forever? Is there *any* reason to think we'll do better in the future?

So many questions; so few answers. - Nick Barbaro

Committee Finds Grounds For Hall Impeachment

The civil war involving the University of Texas' leadership took a turn on May 12 as the House Select Committee on Transparency in State **Agency Operations** voted that there were grounds to impeach controversial UT System Regent Wallace Hall.

Hall, appointed by Gov. Rick Perry in 2011, is accused of orchestrating a witch hunt to remove UT

President Bill Powers, and of abusing his office (most particularly through open records requests) to achieve that goal. The committee agreed 7-1 (Rep. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock, was the sole nay in the Republican-dominated committee) that there were grounds for impeachment, and will meet again May 21 to draft articles, which will then go the Legislature. If the articles are approved by the full House, Hall will face a trial by

him from office.

While impeachments of any kind are a rarity, this has been a particularly long, ugly, and almost unprecedented process. Hall has slung mud constantly at lawmakers, accusing them of abusing the impeachment process to cover for other legislators who used their office to get relatives into UT. However, if Hall intended to force Powers out, he seems instead to have reinforced the president's position and increased his popularity among the Longhorn community, while in February, UT System Chancellor

Francisco Cigarroa quit to become head of pediatric transplant surgery at the UT Health Science Center in San Antonio (he has said repeatedly it has nothing to do with Powers or Hall).

The Texas Coalition for Excellence in Higher Education described the House committee vote as sad, but necessary. In a statement, the group said, "The distraction and dysfunction caused by

> Regent Hall's actions have caused substantial damage to UT Austin and the UT System, and the people of Texas deserve better from those given responsibility to govern".

Cue the predictable shoot-themessenger posturing from Koch Bros. front operation Americans for Prosperity-Texas, whose state director Mike Hasson and policy director Peggy Venable complained in an open letter that "the Committee's vote today sets a dangerous precedent that threatens both the credibility and authority of the Legislature" Another arm of the Koch-related

spin machine, Watchdog.org, immediately sent out a "months-long" analysis, regurgitating Hall's claims of legislative nepotism in the law school.

In contrast, House Speaker Joe Straus thanked the committee, and delicately (if pointedly) suggested that the UT System leadership put its own house in order and take steps to redress "the harm that some regents have inflicted."



Ex-APD Detective Indicted in Shooting

On Monday, a Travis County grand jury indicted Charles Kleinert on manslaughter charges for the fatal shooting last year of Larry Jackson Jr. The former APD detective turned himself in to the Travis County Justice Complex Monday afternoon, and was immediately released on personal bond.

The grand jury considered the case for seven weeks, ultimately ruling that Kleinert "did then and there recklessly cause the death of Larry Jackson by striking and by attempting to strike Larry Jackson with the defendant's hand while holding a loaded firearm." The indictment also said that Kleinert created a "substantial and unjustifiable risk" in attempting to seize Jackson while holding a loaded firearm.

The shooting occurred July 26, 2013, under a bridge near Shoal Creek Trail. According to police, Kleinert encountered Jackson while investigating an unrelated robbery at the West 35th Street Benchmark Bank. Jackson attempted to enter the locked bank twice. After the second attempt, the bank manager confronted Jackson, who reportedly misidentified himself.

The manager then reported the incident to Kleinert, police said. Kleinert had a brief conversation with Jackson before Jackson fled. Kleinert pursued on foot, later commandeering a car in pursuit of Jackson. After a scuffle, Jackson was fatally shot in the back of the neck. He was unarmed.

At the time, Austin Police Assistant Chief Brian Manley maintained that Jackson was at the bank to "commit a fraud." Reportedly, Kleinert told Internal Affairs investigators that his gun fired accidentally during the altercation. That investigation was never completed due to Kleinert's sudden retirement in October.




The incident prompted civil rights groups, including the Texas Civil Rights Project and Austin NAACP, to ask the U.S. Department of Justice to reopen an investigation into APD's use of force. City Manager Marc Ott made a similar request shortly after. The DOJ declined to intervene; in a September letter, Jonathan Smith, head of the DOJ's special litigation section, said the city already had proper oversight mechanisms in place as a result of the DOJ's recommendations made in 2007.

Meanwhile, Jackson's mother and stepfather, Billie and Larry Mercer, charged that the shooting was no accident. In September, attorney Adam Loewy filed a lawsuit on behalf of the family alleging racial profiling was at play in the shooting. Separately, City Council considered a proposed settlement benefiting Jackson's three minor children. In February, Council postponed any action until the grand jury decision.

At a press conference held shortly after the grand jury's action, Billie Mercer said the indictment was the best Mother's Day gift she could ask for. Loewy added, "This is a very good day for justice." It is uncertain how the civil suit will proceed.

Kleinert's supporters, however, expressed confidence that he would not be convicted. In a statement, Combined Law Enforcement Associations of Texas Executive Director Charley Wilkison said, "This case

is complex and may very well take some time to ferret out the truth."

Mayor Lee Leffingwell and the Austin Police Department each issued similar statements saying they respected the jury's decision. Austin Police Monitor Margo Frasier asked for others to respect the decision as well. "Whenever there is loss of life. we want to see a full investigation and due process for all involved," she said. Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg declined further comment, saying, "Because this is a pending case, no documents will be released."

If found guilty, Kleinert faces prison time of two to 20 years and a fine not to exceed - Brandon Watson \$10,000.

Except for Eanes, Area School Bonds Win Big

In case you missed it: The May 10 municipal elections came and went without much of a fuss or many voters at the hallot hoxes

In terms of turnout, these elections had everything going against them. Sandwiched between the much higher profile primaries on March 4 and the upcoming primary run-offs on May 27, these were also for small governmental entities, such as the city of Bee Cave and the village of Briarcliff. The title for tiniest turnout went to Pilot Knob Municipal Utility District No. 2, which had five propositions and four permanent directors on the ballot, but only two people voting.

The good news for Travis County residents, most especially the elections division staff, is that all these races are now settled. Before election day, Travis County Elections Clerk Dana DeBeauvoir had noted the risk that some of the smaller mayoral or council elections could potentially go to runoffs, but after E-Day, spokesperson Ginny Ballard said there were clear winners in each reporting entity, whether by straight majority or plurality.

The biggest loss of the night was undoubtedly in **Eanes** ISD, where 55% of the 7,007 voters rejected an \$89.5 million bond proposal. The money would have paid for essential school renovations, including a replacement elementary school that the district argued would better serve the current population. However, the plan faced an orchestrated and wellfunded push back from Citizens for Academic Excellence in Eanes, a PAC founded by former school-board members Al Cowan and Clint Sayers. Through a combination of standard fiscally conservative cant, and grumbling that the taxes from Eanes residents would be spent on the 5% of students that were out-of-district transfers, they helped defeat the measure.

There was much better news for investments in education infrastructure in two other local ISDs, with Pflugerville and Round Rock voters approving all their investments by well over 50% of votes cast. Round Rock voters backed three propositions totaling \$299 million, most of it going towards construction to cover growth and technology investments. Just a few minutes drive down I-35, Pflugerville voters passed a \$287 million ask from the district, again mostly going to repairing and repurposing existing structures, and adding new construction to deal with the ever-increasing student population. As always, the passage of these bonds does not necessarily mean that residents will see any immediate impact on their property tax bill. The votes merely give the districts the authority to sell those bonds and pay them back out of taxes. However, the district may not issue them right away, or may structure their release so that any new costs are offset by rising property valuations or increased population.

The question now is how these votes will affect financial thinking in the county's biggest school district, Austin ISD. Its trustees have been considering asking voters to raise the maintenance and operations section of the property tax bill (covering day-to-day operating expenses like wages and power) since the last tax rollback election in 2008, but with little forward movement. They now seem to be edging towards a vote in either May or November of 2015. However, according to Board President Vince Torres, the board is also considering a small interim bond package to cover vital renovations and investments, and they could well feel more bullish after good results in neighboring districts. - Richard Whittaker

Primary Run-Offs: Tea Party vs. Old Guard

It's the conservative old guard versus the Tea Party radicals in the GOP primaries, as the fallen contenders endorsed in the run-off races for attorney general and lieutenant governor.

The big headlines went to Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson, who this week announced that he's backing incumbent Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst over challenger and Tea Party Caucus chair Sen. Dan Patrick, R-Houston. Pulling no punches, former marine and Vietnam War veteran Patterson accused Patrick (or, as he was known then, Dannie Scott Goeb) of being a draft dodger. Patrick's campaign fired back that their candidate would have served, but was declared medically unfit because of issues with his leg. Patterson witheringly responded, "Bad knees were an epidemic during the Sixties among young draft age men."

Over in the attorney general race, endorsements took second place to allegations of malfeasance between the candidates to replace Greg Abbott as he seeks the governorship. Tea Party fave Sen. Ken Paxton, R-McKinney, should have been riding high after picking up the endorsement of former U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft. But at the same time, he lost the backing of his local Allen Police Association after he was fined \$1,000 for procuring business for an investment company without being registered with the State Securities Board. This was quickly followed by the announcement that Railroad Commission chair **Barry Smitherman**, who was knocked out in the first round of this race, is endorsing Paxton's more institutionally-inclined conservative adversary, Rep. Dan Branch, R-Dallas. Calling the board ruling "very troubling," Smitherman said Paxton "also failed to disclose his employment as an investment advisor to his legal clients, a possible violation of the State Bar's rules for professional responsibility."

Meanwhile, in the agriculture commissioner race. former Rep. Tommy Merritt battles it out with his old chambermate Sid Miller. Both were purged by Tea Party insurgents, but that bit Miller harder, as he had authored the infamous mandatory pre-abortion sonogram bill. While Merritt is scarcely a liberal, if he wins on May 27, then Democrats and centrist GOPers may enjoy a degree of schadenfreude at the super-radical Miller's expense.

Davis: Abbott Failed to Police CPRIT

What did Attorney General **Greg Abbott** know about corruption at the **Cancer Prevention Research Institute of Texas**, and when should he have known it? Those are the questions Democratic gubernatorial candidate Sen. **Wendy Davis** is asking of her Republican opponent, challenging whether he turned a blind eye as millions left the fund without oversight – and in spite of constant complaints by the agency's own experts.

It's become one of the potentially most

damaging and pervasive scandals in recent Texas political history: A state fund, created to fight cancer, funneled cash to private firms with little or no oversight. It's a sad switch from CPRIT's origins as possibly the state's last truly bipartisan measure. In 2007, voters statewide passed **Proposition 15** by a margin of 61% to 39%, creating the agency and allowing the issuance of \$3 billion in bonds. However, lawmakers intervened in 2012 after a series of mounting scandals. A large number of CPRIT researchers quit over how multimillion-dollar grants were approved without sufficient scrutiny. The scandal broke after letters between the agency's chief science officer. Nobel laureate Dr. Alfred Gilman, and CPRIT's Chief Commercialization Officer Jerry Cobbs were released, in which Gilman repeatedly questioned the ethics of multiple grants, while Cobbs shot down his criticisms. Gilman finally resigned in protest over \$20 million to local research incubator groups, and he was quickly followed by a slew of topranked researchers from bodies including the Harvard and Stanford medical schools, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, and the Koch Institute for Integrative Cancer Research. By contrast, Cobbs is currently under indictment in Travis County for the first-degree felony of securing execution of a document by deception, regarding the granting of \$11 million to Peloton Therapeutics Inc. In January 2013, CPRIT was subject to a damning report by Texas State Auditor John Keel, advising that it revamp every stage of the grant process, from evaluation to research progress, after which lawmakers effectively shut it down, and opened back up with increased controls and oversight.



Arguably, oversight was what was missing in the first place. It was supposed to be there, and Abbott was supposed to be providing it. From its inception, CPRIT had an oversight committee, which included both the attorney general and Comptroller Susan Combs. However, out of 23 committee meetings between June 23, 2008, and Feb 25, 2013, Abbott attended exactly zero. Abbott's campaign spokesman Matt Hirsch has since said that he removed himself, rather than face conflicts of interest. However, rather than stepping down completely, he sent designees from his office: Then-Deputy Attorney General for Legal Counsel Andrew **Weber** attended the first meeting, then the task was handed over to Deputy Attorney General for Government and External Affairs Jay Dyer, who would himself miss several meetings in the following four years. Hopefully, they were giving Abbott extensive notes, because he did not seem to be that inquisitive. The Dallas Morning News found that in his five years on the committee. Abbott sent a grand total of nine emails to "key state officials" on CPRIT's problems.

So what was keeping Abbott so distracted? Democratic pressure group the **Lone Star Project** went through Abbott's diary and compared his calendar with the committee's schedule, and found that on 10 of the 23 meeting days, he had no official events booked. And what kept him busy on the

other 13? A lot of time with the press. He crammed 20 interviews and briefings into those days. He even skipped meetings at the height of the public scandal, after the release of the Cobbs-Gilman emails. On Oct. 24, 2012 (less than two weeks after some of the nation's leading cancer researchers had severed all ties with the agency in protest over its mismanagement and their concerns of **nepotism** in the incubator grant), both Abbott and Dyer were absent, even though the top item on the agenda was the discussion of hiring a replacement for Gilman. Instead, the state's top attorney was busy on Fox News ginning up a false controversy about international elections monitors visiting Texas to observe the Democratic process.

As the scandal grew in 2012, Abbott's office originally announced its own investigation into the CPRIT allegations. However, so far it has made no progress, and now Davis and the Democrats are impugning Abbott with more than just allegations of incompetence and disinterest. Instead, they are accusing him of turning a blind eye as his own campaign donors raided the fund's coffers. That's the same allegation that has hit Gov. Rick Perry - in fact, many Democrats have suggested that was the real reason that the governor effectively tried to blackmail Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg into resigning after her DWI arrest. In that case, a grand jury has already been impaneled to investigate whether Perry committed a crime by cutting state funding for the Public Integrity Unit (the body charged with investigating corruption by public officials statewide, which operates out of Lehmberg's office).

Texas lawmakers have become increasingly queasy about Perry's pet projects, such as the **Texas Emerging Technology Fund** and the **Texas Enterprise Funds** (see "Perry's Fund Imbalance," Oct. 6, 2010.)
But this is the first time these issues plaguing the governor's mansion have tracked back to the attorney general's office. The Lone Star Project calculated that companies owned by or invested in by Abbott donors received nearly \$43 million from CPRIT, and that since 2001, those same beneficiaries of the state's largesse had handed almost half a million dollars over to his campaign.

Abbott has fired back that Davis' allegations are "offensive," and he's been trying to resurrect a conflict-of-interest scandal to retaliate. His campaign has revived old allegations - first deployed against Davis in her 2012 Senate re-election campaign - that her work as a lawyer for the North Texas Tollway Agency is part of an investigation by the FBI. However, an earlier investigation of Davis by the Travis County D.A. found nothing worth pursuing. Moreover, the NTTA has stated that the federal investigation is into current and former board members, and Davis has never sat on the agency's board. - Richard Whittaker

'Orange' Author: Kids Don't Belong Behind Bars

Orange Is the New Black author **Piper Kerman** was in town May 7 to keynote a benefit for the **Council on At-Risk Youth**. Since the publication of her bestselling prison memoir – the inspiration for the popular Netflix series with its second season set to premiere June 6 – Kerman has become a leading advocate for criminal justice reform. We spoke with her on the morning before the CARY benefit.

Austin Chronicle: You're going to speak to a group of people who work with kids who are at risk of possibly ending up on a path to prison. What message do you have for people who work with at-risk kids?

Piper Kerman: Well, the Council on At-Risk Youth has been doing their work for a long time, and they have great, great success and an amazing track record to show for their work with kids who are most at risk for being

pushed to the margins of society. There's so much room for reform you can almost start anywhere, but I think the most important place to start is at the beginning of the system for many individuals. I think everyone can see that not only is that important for those individuals, those young people, but it yields dividends for us as a community, because the cost of helping a kid through an organization like the Council on At-Risk Youth is very low – it's \$750 per youth, per year, as opposed to \$125,000 a year for Texas taxpayers to lock up a child. And so, again, the real dividend though, is that when those kids are on a better path and they're not going to be involved with the criminal justice system as adults, that's equally as important as that very significant cost differential.

AC: You have certainly studied Texas' prisons and juvenile justice system.

PK: Well, you know, Texas has done great things. I mean, as much as Texas has a reputation as having doubled down really hard on prisons, Texas has also done important reforms in recent years, which have significantly reduced the overall prison population with no increase in crime. So that is really, really important stuff in terms of saving taxpayers' money, in terms of having more bountiful and productive communities out here on the outside. ... If we're going to spend any taxpayer money, let's spend it on productive things and not on prisons and jail cells.

AC: Are you familiar with a report that was released last month by the University of Texas Law School's Human Rights Clinic that detailed the lack of air conditioning in Texas prisons?

PK: I can't comment specifically on the report's contents, but I know I've heard of very inhumane conditions in places like Arizona, which has some of the same physical conditions as perhaps part of Texas. I think that folks should keep in mind that people feel like prison should be horrible - prison is horrible – no one should imagine that prisons and jails are not punitive. But the problem is this: 95 percent of the people in our prisons and jails – and I think actually the number is probably higher – are coming home someday to our communities. So if we design our prisons and jails to be these very brutalizing places, then we will have people coming home ... who have been brutalized. And their crimes vary – as we all know we put a lot of nonviolent offenders in prison in this country. But if prisons and jails are designed to brutalize people who are then dumped back onto the street after having had those experiences, that is not a recipe for public safety.

Fighting Sexual Assault

Amid growing national momentum, UT-Austin takes steps to protect incoming students

"One in five women is sexually assaulted in college."

This stark statistic is the opening sentence of the first report of the new White House Task Force to Protect Students From Sexual Assault, released April 29 at a press conference attended by Vice President Joe Biden and many sexual assault survivors and activists. The task force was created in January by President Barack Obama, in response to the increasing number of federal complaints filed with the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice by students who charge that their universities and colleges have failed to prevent or effectively respond to sexual assaults against students. Obama has given the task force "a mandate to strengthen federal enforcement efforts and provide schools with additional tools to help combat sexual assault on their campuses."

The report continues: "Most often, [she is assaulted] by someone she knows - and also most often, she does not report what happened. Many survivors are left feeling isolated, ashamed or to blame." According to a 2000 Bureau of Justice study, fewer than 5% of the rapes or attempted rapes were reported to law enforcement, but two-thirds of the

victims did tell another person (usually a friend, not a family member or school official). On campuses, nine in 10 of the women knew their assailants, and roughly twothirds of the rapes took place off-campus.

The dramatically low percentage of cases reported means that all of the statistics around sexual assault are at best uncertain.

And during the orientation period her freshman year, there was a big bonfire on a Friday night. And she was standing there with one of her girlfriend's boyfriends. Nice guy. When it was all over, she said, 'I'm going back to my dorm.' He said, 'I'll walk you back to your dorm.' And he said, 'But on the way, can we stop? I want to pick up my jacket.' And she walked into his dorm, he pulled her into the room, and he raped her."

As it happens, Biden's recollection has a current Austin echo. Before the summer of 2013, attempting to reduce the risk of incoming students being victimized while attending orientation, the University of

and often disputed. Most of what is known about college campus sexual assault is from anecdotes - single stories whose weight is often not felt except by accumulation. During the press conference about the new report's release, Vice President Biden told only one story, one he heard many years ago when Congress first started holding hearings about this issue:

"Her name was Christine. She went to a small college in southeastern Pennsylvania. Texas made changes to the program format. While there are no statistics specifically cataloging sexual assaults that occur during orientation (federal reporting currently mandates universities report only annual totals, and the University of Texas Police Department's reporting statistics are so low as to be nearly negligible), university administrators have long known that some of the factors that lead to assaults - like

easy access to alcohol-infused fraternity parties just off campus - are present in the summertime, and that younger students are more vulnerable than upperclassmen. Many fraternities, since their parties are, to a great extent, member-recruitment events, purposefully plan them so that incoming freshmen can attend.

During and after the summer of 2013, as far as UT administrators know, there were no reports of sexual assault. It would seem to be a laudable story of success at a time when universities and the highest level of federal government are trying to find new and more effective ways to prevent and respond to sexual assault. Nevertheless, a central characteristic of these cases is the silence of victims; what can we know of what advocates at UT were able to achieve last summer? And what should the university do, going forward?

The Risk

On the morning of July 15, 2010, 18-yearold Sarah Ellis woke up in Round Rock in the bed of a strange man (Ellis' name has been changed to protect her privacy). The last thing she could remember from the night before was looking for her cell phone and purse at the Sigma Phi Epsilon house, located minutes from the University of Texas campus. Ellis was attending orientation, and had been invited to a Sig Ep house recruitment event. The fraternity provided party guests with a punch mixed with Everclear (190-proof clear grain alcohol). Ellis got very drunk, and at the point when she realized her judgment was impaired, she searched for her belongings. But before she found them, reads the petition she filed against the fraternity last year, "she sat down inside the fraternity house and lost consciousness entirely."

How Ellis ended up in Round Rock the next morning remains unknown. At some point, a man unaffiliated with the fraternity kidnapped her, drove her many miles from campus, and sexually assaulted her. According to Ellis' suit, the next morning she "was dumped by the sexual predator

at the Austin location of a McDonald's restaurant ... miles away from the university, without a telephone, without any money,

and without a substantial portion of her undergarments." Someone brought Ellis into their home and called the authorities. She was taken to a local hospital where "she received postassault treatment."

Her cell phone and purse were found later that day, in the fraternity house.

In a May 2013 deposition, the assistant rush captain at the time of Ellis' kidnapping and assault said that the frequent fraternity parties that summer were about "trying to do some recruitment for the guys that were in town" for freshmen orientation. He adamantly denied, however, that the fraternity would directly invite young women who were visiting for orientation. In her lawsuit, however, Ellis claimed that "the invitation of incoming freshman women to parties ... is an annual event during summer freshman orientation sessions" and that the high level of alcohol like the punch she drank that night is provided to create a "sexual opportunity for members of the chapter." Recently, the judge dismissed the case against the fraternity, since there was no evidence that a member of the fraternity "provided, sold, or served" her an alcoholic beverage or that the fraternity's "alleged provision of alcohol proximately caused her alleged kidnapping and sexual assault."

The Federal Context

In the Ellis case, the criminal justice system declined to acknowledge a connection between alcohol-fueled fraternity parties and the possibility of sexual assault, but the administrators of UT's orientation program did see one. Under Title IX (the federal law best known for requiring gender parity in sports), a university receiving federal assistance must ensure that every person who attends the school has equal access to educational opportunities. A campus with known sexual predators among the student body is an obstacle to that access; universities that do not adequately protect students from sexual assault or ignore reported assaults are, therefore, in danger of losing federal funding.

The most difficult aspect of Title IX has always been enforcement. Since the crime of sexual assault is rarely reported, how to measure if universities are doing enough? Victims of sexual assault are often afraid or ashamed to report the attack, or they fear they'll be blamed for the circumstances of the assault. When they do speak up, they are often not believed. As one consequence, only a fraction of rapists land behind bars. Nevertheless, the 1990 Clery Act (aka the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act) created standardized reporting requirements, requiring colleges to be more transparent about crimes taking place on their campuses; the law has been amended and broadened several times.

The latest amendment, enacted last year, is called the Campus Sexual Violence Elimination Act, or Campus SaVE Act. In order to comply with Title IX, the Clery Act, and SaVE, universities must perform a list of actions that include collecting data on interpersonal violence, providing victims with information about their right to report, conducting prompt and fair investigations of reported assaults, and educating students on such subjects as how to intervene as bystanders and how to reduce their risk of being assaulted.

Voices – and Actions – Against Violence

It's a lengthy and complicated list of requirements. Jennifer Hammat, Assistant VP for Student Affairs and the Institutional Title IX Coordinator at UT-Austin, has a poster-sized chart on the wall behind her desk that captures the complexity of Title

IX, Clery, and SaVE enforcement. "This is the checklist put together by the Association of Title IX coordinators. This one is maddening," she says, as she turns in her chair. "There are five levels: Title IX compliance officers, first responders, responsible employees, faculty/staff, and then students. The 'diamonds' are required by Clery and SaVE. The 'pluses' are implied or necessary elements based on resolution agreements and/or the recommendations by a professional association. The 'checkmarks' are required explicitly by Office of Civil Rights or the Department of Justice."

This hodgepodge of levels and symbols is intended to help administrators create a campus where assaults are stopped before they start, victims feel comfortable reporting, and reporting leads to investigations, consequences, and change. Hammat is currently transitioning to doing Title IX compliance full time; her goal is to have UT meeting the diamonds, pluses, and checkmarks on all five levels. Hammat acknowledges that Title IX is "absolutely a long distance race. And when the gun [initially] went off" - i.e., when Clery was enacted - university administrations "all went, 'Who's running?"



Only now are many campuses beginning to join the race. UT is said to be among the leaders, partly because officials have been educating incoming freshmen about sexual assault for quite a while. Fourteen years ago, Jane Bost, associate director of Prevention and Outreach Services at UT's Counseling and Mental Health Center, applied for a grant under the Department of Justice Violence Against Women Act to address campus safety. With that funding, she established the Voices Against Violence program, to bring attention to the issue of interpersonal violence, promote consent and riskreduction on campus, and to provide services to victims. A requirement of the grant, Bost says, was that "we had to reach freshmen." New Student Services, the office which traditionally runs orientation, committed to enabling VAV "to promote awareness [of]

these issues at freshmen orientation." Bost says "that was a big change and that happened a long time ago." After multiple years during which VAV received a total of \$1 million in federal VAWA grants, UT formally brought VAV into its budget and created institutional support for the program. By that point, Bost says, there was an expectation that education around sexual assault would be part of the orientation curriculum.

And yet, in 2010, Sarah Ellis was kidnapped and raped during orientation, a violent crime made possible by an unregulated, booze-filled fraternity party. While it may have been an isolated and extreme incident, and her assailant was not a student, it was the sort of crime that raises official alarms. Administrators continue to look for more certain ways to avoid exposing incoming students to risk, and also to offer them education on the dangers of sexual assaults.

Entering the summer of 2012, UT President Bill Powers decided to move orientation from New Student Services to the College of Liberal Arts. The shift was in part a result of the Task Force on Undergraduate Graduation Rates established the previous year, aimed at increasing the four-year graduation rate to 70%. Powers asked Marc Musick, Senior Associate Dean for Student Affairs in the College of Liberal Arts, to take on orientation and incorporate the 70% goal. That first summer, Musick heard "lots of stories that were floating around" about students who had been sexually assaulted over the years while attending orientation,

incoming freshmen who attended orientation last summer, no one complained about the new rule, and only one applied for an exemption. During each orientation session, students were divided into dormitory wings, with an orientation advisor assigned to each wing. While "wing meetings" have been a part of orientation in previous years, last summer a mandatory wing meeting was scheduled at 11pm each night. Moreover, any student who missed an 11pm wing meeting would be prevented from registering until the end of the summer – losing the chance to schedule the choicest courses. "If you block

more indirectly. "It can be 'You know, that wasn't really a cool way to talk about your girlfriend or boyfriend," Bost says. It gives these young people both "a very positive message" and "a sense of empowerment."

Musick is proud of what he believes he and his colleagues accomplished last summer. "This was truly a team effort, a university effort, to make sure our students were kept safe." While Musick speaks freely about how his team could make incoming freshmen at orientation safer, he does not draw a direct line between sexual assault at orientation and the kind of fraternity party that Ellis had attended. Rather, he points to many possible off-campus locations. "Sixth Street, restaurants, everything else out there drawing our students away, the parties that are out there," Musick says. "It's not just one activity they're going to, they are going to lots of things." Since the university cannot shut those places and events down, "to keep students as safe as possible, we needed to keep them on campus."

and alcohol often played a role in those incidents. In UT's Annual Security Report, the federally mandated report created by the university, "sex offenses" are only counted annually, with no differentiation for the timing of the incidents. There were 74 reported forcible sex offenses between 2010 and 2012 (23 on campus), but the data do not reflect if any of those occurred during the summer or specifically during orientation sessions. Musick was quick to note that "we didn't have numbers" - again, because of the difficulty of tracking and confirming sexual assaults.

After tackling the issue of graduation rates in their preparation for orientation curriculum in the summer of 2012, Musick told his colleagues that a primary goal at freshmen orientation for the summer of 2013 would be to improve the safety of students, specifically against sexual assaults; his plan was supported throughout the administration. He gathered together representatives of a wide range of offices - New Student Services, Voices Against Violence, Sorority and Fraternity Life, among others. They decided to make two changes.

First, all incoming students would now be required to stay on campus during orientation. (In previous years, as many a third would stay off campus.) Of the roughly 7,000 them from registering when they leave orientation," Musick said, "it's a huge incentive to make sure you are at those wing meetings."

Of the 7,000 incoming students last summer, only 10 missed an 11pm mandatory meeting. Students did complain about these required late-night meetings, but Musick shrugs off that criticism, saving, "Student safety is more important to me." The intent of the two new rules was 1) to keep students from unregulated off-campus venues (e.g., nonsanctioned parties); and 2) to keep them on campus overnight. (From a 2007 National Institute of Justice study: Sexual assaults on students were most likely to occur between midnight and 6am.)

The new orientation curriculum also introduced a series of required videos, the impact of which is harder to measure. Hammat and Bost say the videos are an effective tool to reach thousands of students with a consistent message in a short period of time.

The people at Voices Against Violence helped create a video about bystander intervention - reflecting that a crime can be stopped if witnesses are willing to intervene. While many people imagine bystander intervention to happen only in the moments before an assault is about to occur, Bost says that it often actually works

A Comprehensive Approach

When student organizations (such as fraternities) violate university rules, UT can remove a student organization's status, denying it campus resources. But fraternity houses themselves are private property, and local chapters also answer to their national organizations, which can pull a chapter's charter, severely limiting its ability to meet or even stay in its house. These national organizations, Jennifer Hammat says, "are very aware that they need to do more when it comes to risk management."

When Musick and New Student Services made the changes to orientation that kept people on campus overnight, the fraternities were forced to alter their recruitment events in response. Elizabeth Medina, an assistant Dean of Students for Sorority and Fraternity Life, says her office was tasked with helping "sororities and fraternities who were interested in interacting with orientees ... to do that through the Student Organization Fair that is hosted during each orientation session." She says the sororities and fraternities responded well to that alternative, and it reduced the need for unregulated parties.

More generally, Medina says, the university works with fraternities and sororities throughout the year to teach members about the dangers of alcohol, the problems with hazing, how to manage and mitigate risk, and how to prevent sexual assault. Voices Against Violence also conducts year-round campaigns of its own. Jane Bost notes that the work VAV does with orientation "is one aspect, one piece of a very comprehensive approach."

In another program, VAV performs a production titled "Get Sexy. Get Consent." In these scenarios, audience members choose what the characters will do in interactions of sex and consent. VAV reports that "after attending a performance, 83% of students reported they would act differently in future sexual situations." VAV also has a student organization that helps educate students about topics like relationship violence, and one staff member teaches a course on the subject. VAV has become so vital to the work being done at UT to create a better, more fair, more Title IX-compliant environment, that Hammat said all universities need their own version of this program.

Prevention and Intervention

After last summer, with the major goal of altering the curriculum to reduce years-tograduation rates, orientation has returned to Student Affairs from the College of Liberal Arts. But the 11pm wing meetings and the mandatory housing on campus will remain in place for 2014. There will be more learning opportunities about interpersonal violence, and a continued emphasis on bystander intervention. Bost says, "It's an evolving process. We tweak and try new things."

Compared to the federal level, UT seems ahead of the curve. Alongside the White House task force's new report and the creation of its new site NotAlone.gov, the task force released a 60-second public service video full of famous actors - Daniel Craig, Benicio del Toro, and others, as well as both President Barack Obama and Vice President. Joe Biden. The video has two main messages: prevention ("If she doesn't consent, or if she can't consent, it's rape, it's assault") and intervention ("If I saw it happening, I'd speak up"). During the summer of 2013, UT showed every incoming student a video about bystander intervention. The script was written by Voices Against Violence, two male student leaders from student government introduced the video, and students acted out the script. The main messages of the video were "At UT, we take care of each other." and "I saw something, I did something." This messaging now begins at orientation, and is continued through the many services that Voices Against Violence provides around campus.

UT has a robust and diverse group of tools, services, and people working to make the campus safer. When applied specifically to the finite and more easily regulated space of orientation, it appears that the administration's efforts are working - but Bost cautions against presuming too much from the zero-reporting of assaults last summer. "The fact that we had no reports may or may not really mean anything," Bost says. For her, the success of this new orientation program is that it gets "a very strong message across that we care about each other, we take care of each other."

Hammat also notes that sexual assault statistics and reporting are at best an "imperfect science." In this context, for example, no reports of assault could also be worrisome - the goal is to create a space where victims feel more comfortable coming forward. It's uncertain if the lack of anecdotal evidence about sexual assaults during orientation was caused by the changes in housing and time of meetings. Like Bost, Hammat considers the success of last summer to be the university's larger systemic changes in approach. "We put better training in place for all of our students to know that if they see something that isn't right, they should say something. If they aren't sure, they should ask. We've trained them on consent and what that looks like."



KENNY BRAUN'S GORGEOUS 'SURF TEXAS' TOME INSPIRED THIS YEAR'S SUMMER FUN

Austin photographer Kenny Braun grew up surfing the Texas coast. The culture grabbed him by his beach baggies and never let go. "You get that rush – that connection with nature. Surfing is one of the most intimate and poetic connections to it that we have," he says.



But for all of the evocative images of global surf culture, the ones we all know from *Hawaii Five-0* and *Gidget* and *Endless Summer*, Braun never saw the nuance of Third Coast surf reflected in these impressions. So after years entrenched in the Austin scene, away from his beloved shore, he went home to embark on an art project to honor Texas surf.

"I love the Texas coast," says Braun, "I wanted to have the project be more than just about surf. I wanted to capture the sense of place – impressionistic, like a documentary. Nobody else had treated [the Gulf Coast] like this before."

Chronicle Arts Editor Robert Faires, a native of port town Beaumont, Texas, received our review copy of the UT Press hardback, Surf Texas, Braun's gorgeous coffeetable tribute to the wild outlaw surf. We both marveled at our ol' pal (and Chronicle contributor)'s feat, when Faires knowingly chirped, "Summer Fun!"

In his teens and 20s, Braun surfed legendary spots like the Octagon at Surfside, Bob Hall and Horace Caldwell Piers in the Coastal Bend, High Island on the Bolivar Peninsula, and the jetties bookending the state's coastline in Galveston and Padre. Calling Texas surf spots "legendary" might sound silly to folks who chase the breaks in Hawaii or California, but let us be very clear: There is damn fine surf in Texas.

"I didn't have an agenda," Braun insists. "It was a personal project – not even intended to be a book. It was something I could do to reconnect me with something that I missed, that I loved, and that I thought would make good pictures."

The pictures – a languid series of blackand-white surf shots taken between the mid-Nineties and 2012 – turned out to be *real* good, even inspiring a special section in an alternative newsweekly ... in a landlocked town.

Sure, we admit, a surf theme for *The Austin Chronicle*'s 2014 Summer Fun issue is this side of weird. But Texas surf culture extends into the Hill Country's active lake

life. Ask the sailors, water-skiers, windsurfers, wakeboarders, pleasure crafters, and now, wakesurfers: They know our status as a desireable watersport destination.

This holds true even when we are in profound drought – which we have been for years. Clara Tuma from the LCRA puts 2014 into perspective: "The Onion Creek flood missed the water supply lakes by about 10 miles," she says. "Had it gone a bit more into Lake Travis – what a difference" So, despite our winter and spring rains, says Tuma, "We're in for another hot, dry summer."

There is some hope, however, for our (still blazing) early fall. There are increasing chances, according to weather experts, that La Niña may shift into El Niño, which could dump some much-needed buckets of heavenly precipitation into our parched zone.

A photo spread from Kenny Braun's *Surf Texas* was recently excerpted in *Texas Monthly*. They beat us to the punch. An art show dedicated to the book is up all summer long at Stephen L. Clark Gallery. Clark, whose West Austin Gallery specializes in regional photography – exactly the sort of handsome, grizzled, sepia-toned Texiana that comes to mind – hosted an opening to coincide with the book's launch. According to Clark, the opening party was the largest in the gallery's two decades history, attended, he says, by the denizens of Central Texas' "secret surf society."

Welcome to Summer Fun 2014! As much as I, personally, would love to dive into a completist's guide to all that is Austin water culture and the greater Texas beach culture atlarge (my South Floridian roots are showing), the intention of each Summer Fun issue is to get you daydreaming, dear reader.



SURFING

The original "bad boy" of water sports, surfing traditionally takes place in the ocean with a surfer riding a long- or shortboard on a wave rolling toward the shore.

WAKEBOARDING

Originally known as "skurfing" this sport is a cross between waterskiing, snowboarding, and surfing. Being towed (typically) behind a motorboat, a wakeboarder rides a bluntnosed board over the wakes.

WAKESURFING

Picture wakeboarding: Then drop the rope, and ride the boat's wake. The wake is much like a small ocean wave. Boats have been developed with adjustable ballast for optimal rides, and wakesurfboards are a shorter version of ocean shortboards.

LOCAL WAKESURF PHENOM RALEIGH HAGER ACCLIMATES TO LIFE AT THE TOP OF THE PODIUM

Raleigh Hager has been wakesurfing Lake Austin - or as she hashtags it, #LATX - for the past four years. A two-time women's world champion with eight other first-place titles under her belt, Hager is kind of a big deal, not only in the sport but also as an emergent, bona fide, locally sourced Austin celebrity.

Did we mention she's 12?

Hager won her first championship at the age of 10 and has been winning ever since. With as many wins as she's accomplished, the Hill Country Middle School sixth-grader has also earned a number of wakesurf sponsors, including Day1 Wake (which developed a promodel board - the "Phenom" - in her honor) and a boat sponsorship which comes with a place on Centurion Boats' professional team. It also should be noted that almost-teenager Raleigh makes really funny, focused faces when she's deep in her zone, high atop a wake, and that she has a serious appreciation for black nail polish.

Austin Chronicle: You're originally from

Austin. Do you like it? Raleigh Hager: Yeah!

AC: What's your favorite restaurant?

RH: Wahoo's. I like their fish tacos.

AC: I saw on your Facebook page that you have a stereo/turntable. Your dad is a DJ; do you have DJ aspirations?

RH: Oh, no. I just really like listening to music. AC: What's your most-listened to record right now?

RH: Umm ... an MGMT one. It has "Time to Pretend" on it.

AC: I love that album. You don't have any siblings, correct?

RH: Nope; only child.

AC: *Me* too. Do you enjoy being an only child? RH: Kinda. It can get lonely sometimes.

AC: You have pets, too, right? I heard about your pig? There's a good story behind that. I bet.

RH: Two years ago [before her first worldchampionship win], I bet my dad that if I podium'd at the championship, then I could get a pig. He agreed, because he didn't think I'd podium. That was at the beginning of the season [May through September]. I practiced all summer, got a lot better, and won. AC: Your dad tells me you might go to college in Southern California?

RH: What?! I kinda want to go to UT.

AC: Where do you go to school?

RH: I go to Hill Country Middle. Middle school is so different, I don't really like it. AC: No? Why not?

RH: Well, um ... I kinda get bullied. A lot. AC: I'm so sorry. [Raleigh shrugs.] I was $bullied\ in\ middle\ school,\ too.\ It's\ the\ worst.$ RH: None of my friends go there. [Did you see] those boys on the dock? They're basically my friends. They go to a different school.

AC: I heard that you're teaching them how to wakesurf. How often do you get to come out on the lake?

RH: I've taught a lot of them how to drop the rope, but it's hard. We come out five times a week during the season. In the winter, we skate and hang out. We watch TV, or ... well, we play a lot of Truth or Dare.

AC: Let me tell ya, you'll be playing Truth or Dare for the rest of your life. What do you tend to pick: truth or dare?

RH: Um. Well ... actually, um ... my boyfriend's usually there when we play, so it can ... [Mom interrupts with an unhappy look. Subject changed.]

AC: I noticed your black nail polish. Very nice. Is black your go-to color?

RH: Thanks! Yeah, it's kinda my favorite.

AC: What else do you enjoy doing when you're not surfing or listening to music?

RH: Mostly just skateboard or hang out with my friends.

AC: You skateboard! Longboard?

RH: Yeah.

AC: Awesome. Are you good at it?

RH: Not really. I just like to ride around.

AC: Ever think you'll switch to a shortboard to do tricks?

RH: No, not really. I'd be scared that I'd somehow hurt myself and then wouldn't be able to practice surfing.

AC: When did you start surfing?

RH: When I was 5.

AC: Cool. Your dad said something about you switching board companies?

RH: I tried out a lot of boards. My new sponsor is Dav1 Wake.

AC: What makes a good board?

RH: It has to be lightweight. I used to prefer blunt noses, but this one's rounded, actually. AC: Silly question, but does color ever

JUST DON'T CALL IT WAKEBOARDING

It's a perfect Austin afternoon; we walk the dock between Hula Hut and Abel's on the Lake just a hop, skiff, and a puddle jump from Tom Miller Dam. Leigh Fulkerson gently pulls up in her Super Air Nautique G23, a boat the sales brochures say was "created from the wake up." The boat is all-sinew, built for speed, power, and a nuanced agility to turn lake water into consistent wake surf.

Fulkerson - pals with J.B. Hager, best known as half of the Austin morning radio team J.B. & Sandy - has offered to pilot her craft so we might catch J.B.'s daughter - the women's world champion in wakesurfing - in action. Pretty soon, popular J.B. may have to adjust to being better known by his other role: as Raleigh Hager's dad.

Generally, power boats don't get names (the Minnow, the Bismarck, the African Queen ...), but if they did, says Fulkerson, she'd name this baby B.A.B., or Big Ass Boat. She, like the younger Hager, enjoys wake sports. Once we clear the wake-free zone and get near the 360 bridge, Raleigh puts in and begins her ride. In no time, she's doing things in the air and the curls of the wake that defy logic and perhaps physics.

Raleigh Hager is 12 years old and on top of the world.

J.B. and wife Erin, like all good parents, want the best for their child. Early on, Raleigh faced challenges with focus and restlessness. By age 5, J.B. says, their daughter had "never relaxed" in her life. Then one summer, they went to San Diego, and on the last day of vacation, took a surf lesson. "She took to it," he says, like nothing they'd ever seen before. After the lesson, they found her lying out on a towel on the beach. Again, something they'd never seen before. Soon after, Raleigh came to dad and said, "Dad, this is what I want to do!"

"You have a hyperactive kid and a long, hot summer: You need solutions!" says Hager. So he bought a few ocean boards and began regularly hauling the fam down to Corpus to acheive the sort of Zen that can only be had riding the waves.

Then wakesurfing took off and began eclipsing wakeboarding

"Austin's always acted like a beach town with no beach," says Hager. "Now you have surf culture: same lingo, same lifestyle. Only problem is, you need a \$100,000 boat."

Fast-forward seven years, after Raleigh's time studying with coach Dean Lavelle in Pompano Beach, Fla., after blowing women twice her




age out of the water (pun intended), after winning eight first-place titles in the sport, including two world-championships, and the boat ... Well, hold on to your boardshorts: Young Raleigh Hager, Austin's wakesurf phenom, has landed a professional sponsor contract with Centurion Boats, a powerhouse in the watercraft industry, a major "get" in the budding sport, especially for such a young competitor.

"It's huge," says Todd Gaughan of Centurion Boats. And while the terms of the contract are strictly confidential, he beams, "She'll stay in the latest and greatest boats we have [like the Enzo FX44]." With this arrangement, Raleigh will become a brand ambassador, a member of Centurion's globetrotting team of pro

athletes, give feedback to engineers about the crafts' handling, have a stake in influencing design, and learn about the boat industry and its emergent technologies. Not a bad career kick for a middle schooler.

While dad J.B. jokes about how his daughter has already passed "that sweet window between the ages of 8 and 12, when her mom and I were her rock stars," he says her work in the field has helped in other areas, too.

"She's shy by nature, but she likes promoting the sport, coaching her friends, and explaining it to people." He smiles, "Just don't call it 'wakeboarding.' - Kate X Messer

SLIPPERY SLOPE

TO WATER-PARK JEFE, SCHLITTERBAHN'S JEFF HENRY. WHIMSICAL SALVAGE IS NO MERE WHIM

"This is the fun part of my job," says Jeff Henry, principal and co-owner of Schlitterbahn Water Parks, as he thumbs through a ream of 8.5-by-14 sheets an inch and a half deep. The hefty doc looks like the opposite of fun and more like a last-minute exam cram. It is, in fact, an old prospectus loaded with specs, pictures, and data of an oil rig built in 1969 and currently for sale as salvage – all 20,000 tons of it.

"I get to go through stuff like this. I sit up until 5am, start reading, and can't put it down."

Henry, an award-winning inventor and water-park magnate, has implemented, designed, or somehow had his hands in the gushing stream of water-park technology for over three decades. He holds over 60 patents on some seriously splooshy technology. Whether he was the brains, the brawn, or the funding, his foresight exponentially advanced an industry that now has tech standards like the Master Blaster uphill watercoaster; the Boogie Bahn FlowRider surf simulator; the AquaVeyer guest conveyor belt (which utilizes a giant, bright blue Archimedes' screw to churn water to propel the thing); the Transportainment system of guest traffic management; and the bedrock of the industry: filtration, circulation, and reclamation systems to conserve that precious commodity, water, to look up to. Henry and his merry band of equally eccentric engineers and brainiacs have left distinct footprints, visible, not only in the domestic Schlitter-family of parks across Texas and in Kansas, but in destinations across the planet like the world-renowned Atlantis mega-resorts in the Bahamas and Dubai.

He flips through his phone's photo gallery like a giddy kid showing off a shelf full of freshly built Lego kits: "I might be able to save that ship ... I really want to buy that one ... There's a piece we put on a barge" Except these are pictures of mammoth structures - like this oil rig, those ships, that marine crane, a couple of 80-foot bridges, and 700,000 pounds of chain - which will be

transformed into ridiculously fun set-pieces, structures, and rides at Schlitterbahn.

"When I get a piece of massive structure like that, guess what I get to do?" he asks with wild eyes and an endearingly dopey grin. "I get to dream bigger."

Jeff Henry's been dreaming big since the early days when parents Bob and Billye bought the Landa Resort on the Comal River in New Braunfels and began to develop what is now Schlitterbahn (a word which loosely translates from German into "slippery road," for those of you who've been living under a *felsen*). "I started out buying inner tubes for a quarter at gas stations and renting them out. From that, I built a tube chute so I could charge more money. That's really what got me going."

He then begins to describe his work history and work ethic - a circuitous voyage which sounds and feels, not surprisingly, like a ride on the Master Blaster: "I don't have a job, I have a lifestyle. I get up in the morning and go 'til I drop. I've been a shortorder cook, a bottle-washer. I've been a janitor, I've done laundry, I've stripped rooms and remade them. I've done every job that there is, pretty much."

"Applied materials technologist" is how Henry punningly refers to his role and skill set. "I apply used materials that I find some people call it junk; some people call it trash; I call it found art. I'm really good at ripping up something, figuring out how to use it, and applying it to the amusement business I grew up in. It's second nature to me. I like it. It's fun. I like reusing materials more than using new materials.'

What many visitors may not realize upon entering a Schlitterbahn water park, is that



much of the ingenuity on display is recycled from something else. The original New Braunfels flagship was carved out of two previous relaxation destinations: Landa Resort and Camp Warnecke. And recent remodels and renovations, including the new resort on South Padre Island, the luxurious Treehaus suites in New Braunfels, and the upcoming park slated to open this summer in Corpus Christi, employ chunks of ship salvage, retired hotels, old theme-park parts, and scores of timber reclaimed from the devastating 2011 Bastrop County wildfires.

At Schlitterbahn, sustainability may create whimsy, but it's no mere whim. So please don't say "greenwash" to these folks. They've been walking the walk since their earliest days along the Comal. Repurposing decommissioned and deconstructed items can be quite time-consuming and is not cheap. Henry's peers in the industry - a business that survives on the newest, brightest, shiniest, latest, greatest tech - might bray at that high cost to ready salvage for reuse.

"They're probably right," he acknowledges with frustration. "But there's something really wrong with a society that



doesn't reuse things that are reusable. There's something really wrong when labor rates are so high that you can't afford to pull nails, so you grind up perfectly good twoby-fours and cut down perfectly healthy trees in order to drive up a model of life that is based on consumption rather than based on sustainability."

Adena Lewis, tourism coordinator for Bastrop County is pretty bowled over by Henry's offer of new life to felled trees amidst the unthinkable loss experienced by her hometown, after the most destructive wildfire in Texas history wiped out more than 32,000 acres, much of which was populated with the beloved loblolly pine. Escaping a fate as ground-up mulch, the forest has risen again as rough-hewn decorative siding, smooth decking, and imposingly sturdy furniture at all of the water parks. The South Padre resort even features an event space called "The Bastrop Room" and a pizza cafe named the "Loblolly Grill."

"Schlitterbahn initiated this project from their heart, and it has touched the heart of Bastrop County," says Lewis. "It was all their idea. To see a continuing value and use of the trees of Bastrop County to bring joy and happiness is an additional way to help us heal."

Henry's Schlitterbahn Development Group is an industry leader, no doubt. A quick click of the remote to tune into any of the Travel Channel's top-water-parks shows always includes the Texas-grown attraction. The adrenal rush and cutting-edge tech of new crazy rides surely contribute to this. But what Schlitterbahn has over other water-park chains is that they remain a family business. To their core.

In the early Nineties, Henry and potential competitor, California surfer-turnedinventor Tom Lochtefeld met at an industry conference and decided, instead of coming to loggerheads, to come together to create the first FlowRider. Central Texans know it better as Schlitterbahn's Boogie Bahn, a 50,000-gallon-per-minute whoosh of humanmade wave, the world's first surfing ride – a big, puffy sideways half-pipe covered in soft, blue foam, and a constant flush of water. "Tom did all the development, and Jeff funded it, took a leap of faith, and was

integral in getting it off the ground," according to Lochtefeld's son, Ranney. "Jeff is an incredibly creative guy, always looking to do new stuff." A similar technology drove the pair's next collaboration: the Master Blaster uphill surf coaster. "My dad did the prototyping, and Jeff did the full development and handled sales," says the younger Lochtefeld. The pair's technological offspring arguably launched the inland surf movement that's currently making waves in the trade.

This year, Schlitterbahn celebrates 35 vears in the entertainment industry - not with specially marketed swag, not with bells, whistles, nor fireworks displays, but with continued free parking, free inner-tube use, and the freedom to bring in your own picnic basket (leave the glass bottles, jars, and Uncle Ed's flask at home, please). Radical for a company within an industry hot to squeeze every last drop of point-of-purchase impulse out of every pair of board shorts.

"Schlitterbahn has a repeat business," says Henry. "People come back because there are memories built on good times in the Hill Country or on the beach. Our goal is to bring an integrated experience to people, a place where they can bond and be together and build these lasting memories. There's a lot of competition for people's time, but not much competition for things that people can do together," he insists.

And when you're in the business of nostalgia, comfortable worn-in objects, familiar adventure themes, and "found art" begin to make a lot of sense.

Meanwhile, Jeff Henry and the Schlittercrew are prepping for an epic summer. The season has just begun for the four parks in New Braunfels, Galveston, South Padre, and Kansas City, and the one farthest north has a new sight on the horizon. The KC park team is unveiling the world's tallest waterslide, Verrückt (confirmed with an official Guinness World Record ceremony), and down south, a team captained by Henry is polishing up the new park in Corpus Christi for her debut later this summer.

Now, if he could only figure out where to stick this 20,000-ton oil rig \dots

'Barton Springs Underwater'

PHOTOGRAPHER MARTHA GRENON DIVES DEEP INTO AUSTIN'S FAVORITE SWIMMING HOLE

It took 33 years of living in Austin for Martha Grenon to be baptized into the Barton Springs faithful. She savs she's sorry that it took so long. But when the photographer and former Chronicle art director fell into Austin's favorite swimming hole, she fell hard. At the coaxing of a neighbor who had been swimming there every morning for 30 years, she started going and soon became a regular. After a while, she began bringing a camera along and photographing other swimmers. She recently pulled some of her favorite images into a self-published book, Barton Springs Underwater, which is also the basis of an exhibition at Pro-Jex Gallery through the end of June. The book is gorgeous, which should be no surprise to anyone familiar with Grenon's work. Her photos capture that wonderful liquid chill of the 68-degree water and the breadth of humanity that refreshes itself in this sacred spot. In an email, Grenon provided a little background on the work. - Robert Faires **Austin Chronicle:** Did you shoot these at all times of the year?

Martha Grenon: They were taken at various times of the year. (I swim there every morning, if the weather is not too cold, above 45 degrees.)

AC: What camera(s) did you use? **MG:** I started out using one-use underwater film cameras from Walgreens, then



purchased a Lumix digital underwater camera that's about the size of a pack of cigarettes. This made shooting so much easier, because I don't have to wind after every shot and it has autofocus.

AC: Do the people you photograph know you're shooting them? Do you have any favorite comments you've heard in the water?

MG: Most of the people I shoot are so concentrated on their strokes that they do not notice me (sometimes crashing into me!), which is why I have no comments to relate.

ARTISTS HOSTED A YARD SALE OF THEIR WORK, OFFER SOOTHING TUNES FROM A VENDING MACHINE

It can be a bit daunting, more than 200 open studios and exhibits, but artists and collectives like lnk Tank have me excited about returning for more during the second and final weekend of this year's West Austin Studio Tour. Last weekend, Ink Tank hosted a yard sale where it hocked wares from previous shows, projects, and art parties. Prices were cheap, unmarked in most instances, and that was all part of the show, putting potential patrons in the awkward position of devaluing the art and making offers befitting a yard sale. Ink Tank also invited other participants, who had free rein to sell whatever they wanted, be it bric-a-brac from their garage, old clothing, or artwork. Normally, I'd be put off by this intentional cheapening of the arts, but I couldn't help but think this was a jocular reflection of some of the peculiarities of the mega-studio tours. Don't get me wrong, WEST and EAST offer plenty of good stuff to see, but at times one does get the sense of being surrounded by bargain hunters, and the lack of curation necessitates sifting through items/events of lesser interest to find the real gems. The Ink Tank members don't seem like cynical types, but I'd

gamble there's a bit of mockery to go with their embrace of the tours' quirks, if only in friendly jest.

The yard sale's over, but lnk
Tank has another project touching
on consumerism and contemporary art: a repurposed vending
machine that, instead of dispensing sugared beverages, plays audio


based on the "customer's" selection. The work is made to be modular, so audio can be replaced without too much difficulty and the machine can have a life beyond WEST, with different sound works selected by the collective and guest curators. For WEST, Ink Tank has created a series of relaxation clips, so if you're too broke to pay for therapy or premium yoga, or you just like to laugh at those who do, this should be your first stop. Summer of '75, and there's just one book everyone has to read: Jaws. Not because of Spielberg's movie - which, keep in mind, before its release was supposed to tank - but because Peter Benchley had found the mass market's pulpy pleasure center and jabbed it with a harpoon. Like Mario Puzo and Michael Crichton before him, Benchley had crafted a perfect recipe of drama, suspense, and violence, sprinkled with sex, then kept the literary hoohah to a minimum so that you sped through it like a sailfish chasing a squid. I worked in a used-book store, and the flood of paperbacks with the glossy great white coming in proved that Bantam, which paid \$575,000 for the rights, got its money's worth. I consider it a classic beach read: pure escapism, easy on the gray cells, a little cheap, a little cheesy, races along, and you just can't put the damn thing down. Now, we can all use a beach read to make our summer fun, so we polled some literary pals for theirs. The responses may surprise you.



Famous Authors I Have Known, by James Magnuson (W.W. Norton)

I'm just saying: I wouldn't want to be the only person at the beach without a copy of James Magnuson's Austin-based novel tucked under her arm. What a funny, smart romp! And if its character based on James Michener tickles your fancy, save room for Michener's own *The Drifters*, about hippie, ex-pat, draft-dodging drug fiends. If memory serves, it has some alarmingly good sexy bits in it.



Far Away, From Home

Local authors' summer lit-aways to distant places

Not every summer affords us a chance to journey somewhere exciting or exotic. Maybe the ol' 9-to-5 has us chained to town or a lack of scratch makes travel unfeasible. But even when we're stuck staycationing, books let us visit lands and eras far removed from our own. And how far they transport us doesn't depend on where or when they were penned. A book written in our own neighborhood can be a gateway to any corner of the globe or moment in history, as this year's Summer Fun roundup attests. All five authors have ties to Austin, and yet their books carry us to Okinawa, small-town Appalachia, the future of technology, and even Austin in the days before the Armadillo and MoPac. (This last, Elizabeth Crook's Monday, Monday, has just been selected for the Mayor's Book Club.) So sit down and let someone from home send you someplace far from it. - Robert Faires



Monday, Monday by Elizabeth Crook Sarah Crichton Books, 352 pp., \$26

There are events in life that come upon us as fierce and as sharp as a fingernail breaking backward. Regardless of how we cope and move on, the nail grows back, though the flesh underneath may remain a bit scarred, imperfect. Charles Whitman's shooting rampage from the UT tower in August 1966 could be seen as such an event. Unexpected, horrifying, and impossible for those in his sights that day to counteract.

Elizabeth Crook's novel follows the lives of three such (fictional) people within an accelerated narrative that spans 40-odd years. The tale unwinds like an examination of the ripple effect. At first it may be easy to mistake Whitman's actions for the stone dropped in the water, but the stone here is literally a Stone: Jack Stone, a Vietnam vet who zigzags across the South Mall carrying the wounded to safety. The ripples that radiate from his brave impulse result in joy, death, heartbreak, love, infidelity. Some of the ripples are accidents. Some are people. As readers, we have the benefit of sitting in the sand and watching them break on the shoreline.

Four decades is a lot of "history" to cover in just 350 pages, and at times the writing takes on a summarizing quality, but Crook manages to keep her characters real and in the present throughout, not just figures in a timeline of a tragedy. In fact, this story is the antithesis to the diagram published in the pages of Time magazine shortly after the shooting. Crook forsakes the aerial view and brings your cheek right on down to the scalding pavement. - Danielle White

Above the East China Sea by Sarah Bird Knopf, 336 pp., \$25.95

Some of Sarah Bird's best work has had young adult crossover potential, and Above the East China Sea, about two teenage girls in Okinawa from different

time periods, is no different. Perhaps

because the writer's gift for well-observed

snark translates so easily into the mouths and minds of teens, whose guardedness, yearning for authenticity, and linguistic invention ("smooch nugget" comes to mind) she captures perfectly.

Make no mistake, though: This is Bird's most ambitious novel to date, tackling a World War II tragedy about which most Westerners know little or nothing. During the Battle of

Okinawa, hundreds of island teens known as the Princess Lilv Girls were forced to serve as nurses on the front lines under horrifying conditions and eventually abandoned to die when the Japanese evacuated. Fifteen-year-old Tamiko is one of the many Princess Lily


Girls who jumped to their deaths rather than face the atrocities they'd been told to expect from American soldiers. But on Okinawa, the dead live on, and Tamiko's spirit reaches out to modern-day military brat Luz James, stationed with her toughtalking mom on one of the many U.S. military bases, for help finding peace. Luz herself struggles with suicidal thoughts after

> the death of her older sister, Codie; learning to live with the dead rather than join them is one of the book's grimmer themes.

> Bird depicts Okinawa's island culture, and its violent near-erasure at the hands of Japan and America, in hypnotic detail. At times, Tamiko's voice feels stiff and strained beside Luz's rattling teenspeak, but the history is undeniably gripping, and the shadow of the Afghan War in Luz's background unites the past

and present. Ultimately, this tale of how women and girls survive bloody times manages its happy ending without offering easy answers - quite a feat for such an entertaining read. - Amy Gentry

Thunderstruck & Other Stories

day life. McCracken's stories are eminently readable, more Carson McCullers than Flannery O'Connor, but with an off-kilter humor that makes for strange intimacies in the prose.

Like a tabloid chronicling celebrity



grocery runs, McCracken is interested in the ordinariness of oddball existence: The siblings of murderers still go to the library, the subjects of sideshow documentaries get cancer, novelty musicians struggle in a cycle of domestic abuse. When the sawvoiced woman of "Some Terpsichore" says, "It was not nice love, it was not good love, but you cannot tell me that it was not love," it's a sentiment not limited to a woman with "the voice of a beautiful toothache" in love with a man whose hair looks "like it had been combed with a piece of buttered toast."


Still, some of the finest stories here invert this formula or muddy it by showing average people in extraordinary circumstances, many of which they've chosen themselves, then lost all control over. The lovely and strange "House of Two Three-Legged Dogs" explores a subculture of British expats in crumbling French villas, swilling their lives away in a seemingly benign romantic alcoholism while ignoring the gray bedrock of ordinary familial strife. In the devastating title story, a family vacation to Paris intended to heal garden-variety domestic tensions winds up calling into question not just the integrity of the nuclear family but the possibility of human connection itself. Thunderstruck, indeed. -A.G.

Out of Peel Tree

by Laura Long

Vandalia Press, 148pp., \$16.99 (paperback)

A West Virginia native who came to Austin as a Michener fellow before high-tailing it back east to assume a professorial role teaching English at Lynchburg College, Laura Long understands the eternal tug-of-war that exists between braving new land and keeping one's home in Appalachia. Her debut novel, Out of Peel Tree, captures all the confusing baggage associated with trying to move forward from a land and family still stuck in time, throwing in a good but confusing chronological narrative to cloud the scene for good measure. Through jumpy snapshots, the story tracks a grandmother named Essie, her children, and their children as they grapple with life in tiny Peel Tree, a town 20 minutes north of Long's native Buckhannon that's stayed so small, it still doesn't have a Wikipedia page. Instead, Peel Tree carries the weight of stagnation, stubbornness, and a twisted reverence for convention that can't be found in the idyllic Texas towns for which primary character Corina yearns so deeply. Conjuring this reality demands a web of people that'll have you referring regularly to the family tree in the book's first pages, as 60 years of family covered within a town that doesn't evolve can wreak havoc on one's comprehension. Through that confusion shines a weighted story, one of liberation, determination, and the unwitting ways in which we're mired by our own traditions. - Chase Hoffberger



Smaller Faster Lighter Denser Cheaper: How Innovation Keeps Proving the Catastrophists Wrong

by Robert Bryce PublicAffairs, 400 pp., \$27.99

Two things are clear about the author of Smaller Faster Lighter Denser Cheaper:

He's a smart guy, and he's playing to an audience. His thoughts, research, and historical and contemporary case studies are generally spot on, but the rhetoric slides from earnest to sly to outrageous. Bryce's central thesis is that, despite the panicked cries of radical environmentalists, human ingenuity and technology have and will continue to beat environmental collapse to the punch. In other words, progress comes from expansion and growth, as it always has, and not from

living simply or abstaining from the use of resources at our disposal.

The former Chronicle writer does a fine job at spotlighting companies, individuals, and industries that have succeeded in making innovative products that improve our lives. But in the process, he also condescends to a portion of the environmentalist

community. Greenpeace, the Sierra Club, and Naomi Klein, to name a few, are portrayed as out-of-touch dreamers who desire to abandon civilization and take up residence On Golden Pond. The potshots and name-calling do little more than make Bryce quotable to pundits on the right and distract from his often reasonable points.

The book's later chapters begin to lose

focus and rehash topics covered in Bryce's previous books about "misguided" trends toward green power and energy independence. In these, he adeptly debunks myths of wind and biomass being energy saviors (though he noticeably glances over solar) and argues convincingly for a shift to natural gas and nuclear power. He plays down those power-sources' dangers and highlights their strengths as sensible replacements for undeniably destructive coal. In the end,

it's easy to imagine Bryce taken out of context and quoted on Fox News, and maybe that's by design. Which is a shame, since many of his ideas ring true regardless of - James Renovitch politics.



Antony and Cleopatra



If Antony and Cleopatra were on Facebook, their relationship status would read: It's Complicated. Theirs is an imperfect coupling fraught by marriages with other people, children born, and wars waged. While it's true that by story's end, we have a pair of lovers who end up dead by their own hands, this is no middle-aged Romeo and Juliet. As older characters, they are more thoughtful and complex, not simply driven mad by lack of impulse control. In this play, the eponymous lovers are old enough to know better and thus must take full ownership of their self-destruction.

Although considered one of Shakespeare's seven great tragedies, it is also one of the least produced. Modern companies are often intimidated by its inherent casting and scenic design challenges. Yet this Poor Shadows of Elysium production boils this powerful work down to its essential elements. While 19th century audiences enjoyed the spectacle of lavish palaces and lush gardens in both Roman and Egyptian setpieces, the folks at Poor Shadows are unapologetic in their focus on the text.

Costuming is kept simple. Indeed, Cleopatra's attendants Iras and Alexas look like undergraduates in ill-fitting sheets headed to a toga party in West Campus. The set is little more than a blank canvas. Yet these rudiments aid rather than hinder Poor Shadows' mission to foster an appreciation for Shakespeare's poetic genius. Fittingly, Dr. Joe Falocco, an English professor at Texas State University, directs. Considering the ample cuts made to whittle this show down to two hours and the 16 actors



assuming 39 roles, Falocco and company are surprisingly successful at engaging their audience with fairly disorienting material.

Bridget Farias' lusty Cleopatra is as smoldering as one would hope, flattening Octavia, her rival in the affections of Antony. Farias and her real-life partner Kevin Gates (Antony) have an easy chemistry that is necessarily electric. Falocco, both erudite and affable, gives a helpful preshow introduction, alerting audience members to a color-coding device they've employed in the costuming to help viewers unravel the affairs of state between followers of Caesar and Antony. Red states and blue states? Guess which color represents our hero.

Although said hero's name appears first in the title and the original Elizabethan cast was

all male, this play is clearly a showcase for the feminine Egyptian monarch. Not merely beautiful. Cleopatra is at one time a mother waxing

poetic about her nurslings and a fierce commander in chief at another. Without a doubt, this is one of the most demanding and satisfying roles for a female actor - even as it eerily forewarns us of the myriad demands on the modern woman.

The reader will note my transformed byline this week as evidence that I may have a weak spot for tangled tales of competing allegiances in stories of love vs. profession. Life ain't no fairy tale, and nowhere is this colloquialism more apparent than in the story of Antony and Cleopatra. - Stacy Alexander Smith

The Snow Queen by Michael Cunningham Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 272 pp., \$26

Michael Cunningham's The Snow Queen is a frozen confection of a novel, a simple yet intricate domestic drama written from the multiple viewpoints of a tight-knit, nontraditional family. The brief tale seems exhaled all in one frosty breath, so that when the characters' voices occasionally bleed into one another, it's a testimony to the novel's underlying message about intimacy and connection.

With a lighter touch than Cunningham's Pulitzer Prize-winning Virginia Woolf homage The Hours, The Snow Queen introduces Barrett and Tyler Meeks: two brothers, one gay and one straight, whose lifelong intimacy is amplified during the sickness of Tyler's fiancée Beth, the "snow queen" of the title. The book begins with the recently dumped Barrett seeing a mysterious light in the sky over Central Park, and the mystical revelation haunts the book, its significance never quite explained except as a metaphor

for the characters' yearning to believe that flickers of selfknowledge and connectedness can change us. For Cunningham, such moments are only decipherable through the Rosetta Stone of literature, which is why the most important characters in his nov-

els always seem to have a thorough knowledge of their resemblance to the characters of Henry James and Edith Wharton.

Literary references aside, however, there's an adolescent moodiness to Cunningham's prose, like Michael Stipe lyrics unwisely copied into a love letter, that gets melty in the harsh light of day. As with a Popsicle, the book is best enjoyed in one sitting, before it starts to drip. Whether pondering divine encounters, limning a young man's beauty, or overusing the word "miniature," the prose hovers a bit too much over its own reflection, but is beautiful enough to get away with it. One hopes that Cunningham will continue to knock out another of these gorgeous little snow globes of humanity every four or five years, and that they will always be as lusciously readable as this one.

The Sleeping Beauty Dell Hall at the Long Center, 701 W. Riverside May 9

Is it fair to program The Sleeping Beauty, arguably the most technically difficult ballet in the classical repertoire, on a company whose dancers shine most brightly in neoclassical and contemporary work? Tutus and white tights are the fluorescent lights of ballet, beaming harsh light on every less-than-ideal proportion, broken line, and compromise of aplomb. To add insult to injury, Beauty's pure classicism and symmetry are glaringly matter-of-fact foils for anything less. There are no 32 fouettés in Beauty, but the ballerina must, for example, move through a slow vignette of arabesques and attitudes - in which she must use supreme control to glide in and out of each pose - to solo cello.

Aara Krumpe, as Princess Aurora in the cast I saw, did fine in that section, but much of the ballet was a display of minimum qualifications. Is it fair to promise audiences an astonishing display of classical artistry and then allow them to worry whether the soloists are going to make it through? And for those whose memories of Aurora's entrance are already etched with the effervescent split-legged pas de chats of renowned ballerinas, how could Krumpe's plain ol' everyday pas de chats not be a letdown?





And yet I was thankful to have had those bubbly pas de chats and their legendary performers called to mind. And yet the corps de ballet did a bang-up job, and Oren Porterfield and Ian J. Bethany shone in a near-flawless and inspired Bluebird pas de deux. And yet of all yets, Jaime Lynn Witts abso-် lutely defined the role of Lilac Fairy.

This was the first time I'd seen Beauty in its entirety since becoming a parent, and I found a deeper understanding of Lilac. What a dear figment, this benevolent temperer of any serious troubles that might befall your children! Witts' expansive port de bras and generous arabesques cast a calming spell, embodying Lilac's lullabylike theme in Tchaikovsky's score, invoked beautifully from the Austin Symphony Orchestra by conductor Peter Bay.

One of several oddities in designer Peter

Farner's costumes (on loan, as was the scenery, from Cincinnati Ballet) seemed almost a commentary: Lilac's tiara was the smallest of all the fairies', but who needs rhinestones when you have hundreds of years of technique, artistry, and fairy tales inside you? At the close of Act I, as Lilac hushed the royals and subjects asleep, designer Tony Tucci's lights fell to lavender and strips of moss crept downward from the flies, enveloping the kingdom. Perhaps it's selfish to say, but, for me, Witts' Lilac and this moment were worth all the performance's trepidations. - Jonelle Seitz



Swimming While Fat

I am 12 years old, bathed in the fluorescent light of a department store dressing room, squeezing myself into a girdle-like "Miracle Suit." I am slightly taller than average and not especially chubby, but having tried on all the non-miraculous monokinis and neon, zippered scuba tanks (this is 1990, after all), I have seen something terribly, terribly wrong in the mirror. That something is me. A twopiece is beyond my wildest ambitions; I just want to feel happy at the church pool party. And at age 12, I truly believe that it'll take

Those days are long past.

Nowadays I drown out the disapproving voice in my head – which, coincidentally, sounds a lot like my mother – and don a string bikini or skirted retro onepiece as my mood requires. But what if stores didn't even carry my size – or only carried it in that matronly floral surplice suit with its circulation-defying "tummy control" panel?

a miracle.

Until recently, that was more or less what swimsuit shopping was like for plus-size women. And with roughly a third of us fitting into that category, according to estimates, the operative word here isn't tummy, it's control.

According to **Cathy Benavides**, who blogs about plus-size fashion and body acceptance at **Austin Slave to Fashion**, that's all changing faster than you can say "leopard-print maillot." Despite her blog's name, when it comes to fashion, Benavides is anything but a slave. In fact, she prefers the word "style" to "fashion." "Style is your look," she clarifies. "It's

what you wear to say who you are. And that's completely personal."

On an average, non-swimming day, Benavides favors knee-length dresses in basic black, fuchsia, or classic stripes and polka dots, accessorized with bright flats and a veritable parliament of owls, many of which she inherited from her grandmother. She recently acquired an oversized owl tattoo on her right forearm; her other forearm bears

the Coco Chanel quote, "I don't care what you think about me. I don't think about you at all."

Benavides fills me in on the revolution in plus-size swimwear over coffee. "It used to be onepieces and tankinis, that's it. Now you see strapless, you see bikinis. There's pattern and style. It's not like here, put this on, smooth your lumps!" She pauses, and her voice takes on the quality of a patient, but sorely

tried, goddess. "You know what? They're my lumps. If I want them unsmoothed, that's my prerogative. Why are you so concerned with it? You sound like my mother, website!" She does a quick horrified-mom impression: "You can see your loncas in that!"

Benavides and other bloggers in the thriving online plus-size fashion community have been instrumental in changing the game from *loncas*-loathing to curve-embracing. In 2012, self-styled "fatshion" blogger **GabiFresh** posted pictures of herself looking drop-dead gorgeous in what she dubbed her "fatkini." When the blogger designed a version of her bikini for retail

site **Swimsuits for All**, it sold out in record time.


The fatkini trend showed that plus-size women were hungry for new styles, and they were sick of being told to lose weight or stay home. "There's been this misconception that plus-size women just want to hide their bodies when they put on swimwear," Benavides says. "People think that plus-size women are terribly ashamed of their bodies, when really, that is a projection."

Since the Year of the Fatkini, a variety of new lines have emerged to acknowledge that full-figured women want swimwear every bit as diverse and vibrant as they are. Among the most exciting of these? Josephine Swim, whose flutter crop tops and highwaisted bottoms in subtle safari prints look so fresh I'm tempted to order one myself and have it altered. Ditto Monif C.'s glam collection of luxe styles, including a covetable fringed bikini that makes me want to integrate "blue tiger" into my pattern vocabulary permanently. Plus-size model Robyn Lawley has designed a saucy, French-lingerie style in white and a floral high-waisted bikini with cutouts that's to die for. Curve-friendly brands like Jessica Simpson and Tropiculture are available alongside GabiFresh's bikini at Swimsuits for All. Modcloth.com routinely sells out of Esther Williams' plus-size ruched retro maillots in a rainbow of colors, and has slowly been adding styles. Thanks to the new competition, even plus-size mall chains like Torrid and Lane Bryant have stepped up their swimwear game, offering more and better in-store options.

There's room for improvement, however. Many lines remain online-only, which keeps women from trying on multiple suits and reinforces the idea that they deserve a segregated shopping experience. Old Navy, upon which many plus-size women rely for affordable basics, pulled larger sizes from stores in 2007. Though the sizes are available online, the message is clear: We'll take your money, but we can't be seen with you in public. For large ladies, this can feel painfully familiar. We'll hang out with you afterschool, but we won't sit with you at lunch. We'll have fun with you in bed, but we won't take you out to dinner. It's body-shaming on a mass-market level.

Benavides has her share of bloodcurdling tales about being ignored and insulted in stores, from **J. Crew** to a certain local bridal boutique that rhymes with **Schmelle Schmaison**. (Newsflash: Fat women get married, too!) But she prefers to focus on the positive. Like me, and every other woman who rolls her eyes at the shrill neon chorus of women's magazine covers every spring, she knows that her "beach body" is the same as her going-to-the-store body, her datenight-with-the-fiancé body, and her oh-shit-it's-deadline-day body. It's just a body. And every body is a goddamn miracle.



Riding the Wave of Rum Punch

PLEASANT STORAGE ROOM FUELS SUMMER FUN WITH RUM

Timing can be everything when it comes to new restaurants and bar concepts. Too early and people won't come because it's not yet in their comfort zone; too late and, well, been there and done that. In the two years that lapsed between the highly conceptualized idea for Pleasant Storage Room and its recent opening, its partners definitely felt the pressure of catching the wave at just the right time. With a keen, single-spirit focus – the carefree and often misunderstood rum – and a small-plate format from the kitchen, this Havana-inspired space seems to have arrived right on time for Austin's summer scene.

It all started with punch. Back when chef Paul Hargrove was cooking at East Side Show Room, he clicked with then-bar manager John Kelly O'Hare, who kept coming into the kitchen with wild concoctions to try. "He blew my mind. His punches were so culinary," says Hargrove. "I really wanted to see the punch stand on its own." And

so began a concept based on rum. Enter Jason Schnurr (Cedar Street Courtyard, Peche) who happened to have a Warehouse District space awaiting just the right transformation. When O'Hare ultimately took a job offer in Los Angeles, eyes fell upon Alfonso Hernandez, also a Show Room veteran, to take up the task of creating the bar and the cocktail program. "It's his show," says Hargrove.

Perfecting Pleasant Storage's intricate recipes for drinks and punches was one piece of the puzzle, alongside creating the right menu and setting the decor, which was beautifully handled by Hargrove's wife, Ame Brewster. Unique, weathered pieces – from ornate lamps to working wooden shutters – are consistent with the desired "Havana haunt" feel without being overdone or flashy. The chipped, curved bathtub

that serves as the staging area for ceviche tucks right into the curl of the bar. Your eye catches a little something new and beautiful every time you look around, be it adorable tiki glasses with wooden shafts or the time-worn look of the menus.

"The bar is the primary focus here," says Hargrove. "So I offered Alfonso as much access to the kitchen as he wanted. Grilled garnishes. Smoked fruits. You name it." The drink menu is an eight-page booklet, while the food menu is the front and back of a 5-by-11-inch card. With a Frenchfocused background in New York and a stint, not surprisingly, in Florida, Hargrove is loving the creativity of exploring Caribbean spices and flavor structures, while keeping the methods sound and the plates simple and true. "When I saw the size of the kitchen." he

says, "it's no bigger than a food truck. So I said, 'Let's make it feel like a food truck, and let's focus on Cuba and the islands.'" Think jerk chicken, snapper in banana leaf, grilled street corn – island street food. "There's nothing wacky here. I just made the best Cuban sandwich I could." His favorite selection? The Frita, a ground beef and chorizo burger grilled with onions and red mojo and served with thin-cut fries.

An early summer opening seems to be the perfect time for Austin, getting the wave started, so to speak. A clever campaign, the Summer of Rum, starts this week at Pleasant Storage. Look for videos of head barman Alfonso Hernandez making rum standard drinks to be released on the bar's website, Tumblr, and Facebook page, highlighting what will be that week's drink special. "This is rum," says Hargrove. "This is supposed to be fun. We want to create that experience."


food-o-file

There's just no such thing as a slow culinary weekend in this town anymore, that's for sure. Very Important Tacos at Pachanga Fest, three days of gelato in Republic Square Park, an Alamo Drafthouse Rolling Roadshow feast in the Leagues' front yard, not to mention the kick-off to American Craft Beer Week, and the first of two weekends of Austin Restaurant Week. Whew! Be sure to congratulate Matt Lee of Tèo Espresso, Gelato & Bella Vita (1206 W. 38th) for his third-place finish in the North American bracket of the Gelato World Tour. Lee will now be one of three gelatiere to represent North America in the finals in Italy this fall. His flavor, called Nuts, is an all-American peanut-butter base with a swirl of an Italian favorite. Nutella. Chocolatier and former Austinite Katherine Clapner was also judging, and she reports there are now three **Dude, Sweet Chocolate** stores - two in Dallas and one in Ft. Worth - and she's scouting for a small storefront in Austin.

My favorite aspect of Pachanga Fest this vear was the family atmosphere - during the set by DMK, I observed families watching a family making music. It was delightful and reminded me of hippies of my generation dancing with their toddlers in front of the stage at the Armadillo World HQ. The refreshment spread in the VIP lounge was also a winner. We only managed to make it through the first round of excellent tacos complemented by a salsa and queso bar from El Taquito and Casa Chapala, aguas frescas, and some refreshing Mom & Pops paletas. All in the Family

Three Austin restaurants serve up special Sunday dinners

Among my favorite childhood memories are the Sunday dinners we would share with my stepmother and her big Italian family. These were crowded, noisy affairs of lace tablecloths, cut crystal, and showy china. The mirrors lining the back wall of the dining room made our 15-person meals seem like massive banquet feasts. There was always lasagna or some other tomatoey pasta with meat sauce. There was usually a roast lamb or turkey and, for dessert, we had cannoli and butter cookies. In my imperfect childhood recollection, those Sunday dinners happened regularly, and everyone came bearing smiles and lively conversation.

In fact, those epic meals probably happened only once a year or so. And now that I think about it, I am sure at least one of them ended in tears and verbal recriminations from someone. These days my stepmother no longer talks to her sister, and I no longer talk to my stepmother. But such is the power of a

Sunday dinner to imprint children's minds so strongly that the memories selectively endure, outlasting subsequent hurt and bitterness. In spite of the distortions of time,

in spite of whatever familial dysfunctions persist today, I still treasure those flawed mealtime memories. I am sure I am not alone.

For many families, the Sunday dinner was, and still is, an important tradition. It is a time for decelerating, disconnecting from devices, and, for better or worse, keeping the spark of family alive. Summer is a perfect time to practice the art of leisurely Sunday dining. In summer, there is no Sunday night homework anxiety, schedules are looser, and the hectic pace of life seems to slow, if only for a few months. A few Austin restaurants have

begun reviving the Sunday dinner tradition, making it easier to share a weekend friends-and-family meal without having to spend all day in front of the hot oven.

One of my current favorites is at Olive & June. You don't have to book a trans-Atlantic flight to feel like you are a member of some ancient, landed Italian clan. Dining al fresco under the oak-shaded patio at Olive & June offers a Sunday family-dining experience that is so authentic, you could bottle and sell it, which I suppose is exactly what chef/restaurateur and family man Shawn Cirkiel is doing. Olive & June Sunday dinners are opulent three-course feasts that generally feature two antipasti dishes, followed by a pasta course, and end with a hearty roast (\$29 per person, kids under 12 eat free). The menu, featuring seasonal ingredients, changes weekly and has become an opportunity for the kitchen to test drive new ideas. Recent offerings included kale frittata, crisp arugula and strawberry salad, linguine with olive oil and bottarga (pressed fish roe), and succulent pork roast paired with feisty fennel mostarda. Flavors are vibrant, pastas are all housemade, and the whole ensemble evokes a slow Sunday meal in Nonna's backyard.



The regular menu is also available for diners who need fuller control over their choices. But why bother when the Sunday menus are so consistently stellar? I recommend making reservations in advance because the patio fills fast. And while the indoor dining room is also pleasant, it cannot match the charm of the twinkling lights and the massive 100-year-old oak that dominates the outdoor aesthetic.

A different kind of Sunday spread can be had at Hyde Park's Vino Vino, where piping hot paella comes out of the kitchen promptly at 7pm. For more than half a decade, neighborhood folks and foodies have been mindfully keeping this quaint cafe and wine bar a secret, but I feel like it is time that Vino Vino gets the love it deserves from a wider audience. At Vino Vino, everything from pasta to the ketchup is made from scratch. Chef Jesse Marco prepares two paellas each Sunday, both served from huge, shallow pans at the end of the bar. For \$17 you get a choice of seafood paella, chock-full of mussels, octopus, shrimp, clams, and whatever fish is in season; or a heaping plate of land-based paella made with chorizo, chicken, lamb, and pork. I prefer not to choose and go for a little bit of each. Half plates (\$8.50) are also available to pair with another of Vino Vino's regular menu items. Paella service continues until they sell out, which usually happens toward the end of the night. But it's better to get there early, enjoy a glass of wine first, and then to get it while it is still hot.


Finally, in South Austin, **Lenoir**'s \$40 Sunday night dinner is one of this town's hidden gems. This postage stamp-sized restaurant is a darling of indie chefs and food cognoscenti for its innovative culinary mash-ups like roasted carrots with miso flan and hemp soup topped with Indian chaat. Seats usually book weeks in advance, but on most Sunday nights you can still make a last-minute reservation.

While the regular menu is always a \$38 fixed-price, three-course meal featuring choices at each course, Sunday nights eliminate the choices, offering instead a single four-course meal for \$40. Like Olive & June. the savants at Lenoir use their ever-changing Sunday menu to play with ideas and roll out new dishes. The kitchen at Lenoir is so small that it's not always easy for the chefs to execute and plate all the things they can possibly dream up. So Sunday suppers have become a proving ground. "Our diners put themselves completely at our mercy," says chef and owner Todd Duplechan. Sure it is a bit like a trust exercise, but there are few kitchens I would rely on more to come up with original, soul-satisfying meals so consistently. One other reason for Lenoir's onesize-fits-all Sunday meal is simple: The restaurant itself is a family enterprise, which closes on Monday. Sunday night suppers allow the Lenoir staff and family an opportunity to wind down the week with elegance and ease. After all, isn't that what Sunday supper is all about?

Reservations for all Sunday suppers are strongly encouraged.





Texas 'Forev'

AUSTIN EXPATS MAKE GOOD ON THE FESTIVAL CIRCUIT WITH THEIR DEBUT INDIE COMEDY

These days Molly Green and James Leffler are writing and directing movies together, but when they first met, standing in line for a South by Southwest film screening in 2007, they were just a couple of University of Texas undergraduates with a similar Hollywood dream. They struck up a conversation, and Green told Leffler about a short film she was making. Leffler suggested an alternate title. Green considered his idea, then shot it down.

By all accounts, it was the beginning of a beautiful writing partnership.

On May 15, they celebrate the official release of their first collaborative film, *Forev*. It stars fellow UT alums Matt Mider and Noël Wells – the latter now a cast member on *Saturday Night Live* – as neighbors who, in the course of a desert road trip, half-sarcastically agree to get married.

The two leads had been performing together for years, going back to Esther's Follies in Austin. "We wanted to build something that would be a good fit for Matt and Noël's dynamic," Green says. "We thought, what a good way to put that on display – two people who barely know each other who've decided to get married."

The film's deeper themes mirror the challenges that Green and Leffler were facing at the time they wrote the script, as struggling would-be filmmakers with none of the trappings of a successful adult life. The idea of marriage was particularly

daunting. "We were in our early 20s, working these not-so-legit jobs, feeling like we're not grownups," Leffler says, "and we're getting these wedding invitations com-

ing in from friends from college and high school wearing summer dresses and sweater vests and standing under trees with sunlight streaming through."

"It throws you for a loop, or it did for us, because you realize that these people are adults," Green adds. "You start to see marriage as a real thing in the world that could happen to you."

Not that Green or Leffler would ever be so square as to don sweater vests, except maybe as a joke. Thinking seriously about marriage, however, meant questioning their inclination toward hipster sarcasm. "Sincerity is getting harder and harder to come by," Green admits. "It's easier to jokingly say to somebody, 'Hey, let's get married,' than it is to sincerely tell someone, 'I like you.' That difficulty of sincerity was a big source material for the movie."

So far, audiences seem sincere in their appreciation of **Forev**. After a premiere at the 2013 Los Angeles Film Festival, it won audience awards at the Portland Film Festival and the Tallgrass Film Festival. Reviews have been positive –

the Examiner calls it a "delightfully funny crowd pleaser" – with more on the way as distributors roll out the release on VOD, iTunes, and other formats available at www.forevmovie.com.

Despite its strong Austin roots, *Forev* was made entirely in and around Los Angeles. Building on Austin's reputation as an anti-Hollywood for off-the-beaten-track filmmakers, Green and Leffler represent a new scene of Austin expats in L.A. who carry the banner for weird, smart, quirky fare into the

belly of the beast.

Leffler, a native Austinite, is a true child of the Linklater era. "One of the key moments early on that made me want to make movies was Dazed and Confused shooting on my block when I was 8," he says. "Then the movie came out, and I saw there was a scene on my pony league baseball field, and my across-the-street neighbor was in it. It felt like something that was available to me."

Forev shares that homemade aesthetic. Much of it was shot on weekends at a rented vacation home in the Joshua Tree desert. "The producers cooked all the meals and drove us in minivans and jeeps," Green says. "People camped by set in tents. There was an outdoor shower, which was really fun because it was 114 degrees out one day. Everyone would put on a bathing suit and hop in. Also, a horse trough full of water that people sat in like an outdoor bathtub."

The fingerprints of the Austin expat community are all over Forev – not just through Wells and Mider, but also several crew members, day players, and all-around favor-givers. "We didn't tell people we were going to make the movie until we were for sure gonna do it, the same way as, in the movie, once they tell people they're getting married it starts to feel real," Leffler says. "But once we started to tell people, all our Texas buddies were like, 'When and where? How can I help? I'm there.'"

Forev debuts on DVD, Blu-ray, and VOD on May 15.



Drive, He Said

A CONVERSATION WITH 'LOCKE'-SMITH STEVEN KNIGHT

Ivan Locke is "an ordinary man going through what I like to think of as an ordinary tragedy," says his creator Steven Knight.
From this premise, the writer/director – here-

tofore best known as the screenwriter of *Dirty Pretty Things* and *Eastern Promises* – builds a taut dramatic thriller in which the only action we see is a man in a car driving from Birmingham, England, to London. During the drive, which seemingly occurs in real time, Locke makes and takes a series of calls that we can hear on the car's speakerphone and gradually come to understand his predica-

ment. In 85 minutes we discover that doing the right thing can often be a complicated endeavor, leaving unintended victims and unmet obligations in its wake.

The actor Tom Hardy (*Bronson*, *Lawless*, *The Dark Knight Rises*) plays Locke and delivers a riveting performance. "If you're going to have an actor onscreen for that length of time, he's got to be good," says Knight, "and I think he's

the best we've got. He's one of those actors where even when there are other actors on the screen, people look at him. And that's exactly what was required of this project.



"There was a lot of serendipity surrounding this film," Knight continues. "It so happened that I was meeting Tom about a different project that he wanted me to write, and in talking about the other project I mentioned this idea and the journey, and he was really engaged. So when I wrote it, I was pretty confident that he would do it. We met in November, I wrote it over Christmas, and

we were shooting by February, so it was a very fast process."

Prior to Locke's nine nights of shooting, there was a week of table readings with Hardy and the rest of the cast, whose disembodied voices we hear throughout the film. "With a low budget you get a level of control, and I decided to shoot it for real, effectively. So we put the car onto a flatbed truck, put three cameras in the car at all times, had the other

actors in a conference room in a hotel near to the motorway, where I put in a phone line to the car and then I would say 'Action' once, and I would cue the other actors to come to the phone line and make their calls. Tom had a teleprompter, so he had the script in front of him and in the rearview mirror. So he was always able to read from the script, and then we would shoot the thing from the beginning to the end. We would take a break, and then we'd shoot it

again. We ended up with 16 versions of the film. And then we went into an edit suite and cut together the best of it. Because there was no continuity issue, the choices could always be made on the strength of performance rather than other things. It was a great luxury."

Although he has penned numerous screenplays, *Locke* is only Knight's second feature film as a writer/director (the first was the Jason Statham actioner, *Redemption*), and that brings added attention to *Locke*'s experimentalism. Knight explains: "I'd just finished making a more conventional film, and I wanted a different way of doing the same task of having people engage with the screen for 90 minutes. Also, as part of the same process, we shot a lot of test footage with digital cameras from moving cars in nighttime to see how sensitive they were to light. When I watched that test footage I found it absolutely hypnotic, and I wondered if I couldn't make that into a theatre and put an actor into that theatre and shoot a play, effectively."

Even such things as the head cold Hardy had at the beginning of the shoot were incorporated into Knight's narrative. "We wanted to invite the reality of the world into the process, and on the first day of shooting Tom turned up and had a bad cold. Rather than try and disguise it, we said OK, Ivan's got a cold, and the medicine that Tom was taking was the medicine that Ivan takes, and it worked. It helps with the whole business of him being under pressure."

By stripping down to the basics, Knight has delivered an original work, one that ensures a bright future as a movie-house multihypenate.

Being Cary Grant

"Everyone wants to be Cary Grant," Cary Grant once reportedly said. "Even I want to be Cary Grant." Or, he might have added, to be in the arms of Cary Grant. This summer's series offers no less than four occasions to imagine such a metamorphosis, certainly no more magical than the one that took Bristol-born orphan Archibald Leach to Hollywood, where: "I pretended to be somebody I wanted to be until I finally became that person. Or he became me."

Pretense is a variation that runs through many of his films. He was lucky in directors and writers, but they were very lucky to have him. In The Philadelphia Story (1940), he's society playboy C.K. Dexter Haven, who's seemingly to one side of the main action until he offhandedly re-wins the girl (Katharine Hepburn). In the farcical *Arsenic* and Old Lace (1944), he's Mortimer Brewster, a panicky nephew who discovers his maiden aunts are kindly serial murderers - and after many hysterical complications, is reassured to learn he was a foundling. In Alfred Hitchcock's postwar spy mystery Notorious (1946), his T.R. Devlin is both secret agent and disappointed lover and must outwit the enemy and win back the woman (Ingrid Bergman).

Finally, in Hitchcock's iconic North by Northwest (1959), the advertising executive Roger Thornhill becomes (by mistake) another secret agent, who then exploits the double identity to outwit his enemies and, once again, win the girl (Eva Marie Saint). Hitchcock, who considered most actors to be props (or "cattle"), called Grant "the only actor I ever loved."

Even Hitch wanted to be Cary Grant. On the big Paramount screen, here's your chance. - Michael King

It's Bogie, Baby

I was just a kid the first time I laid eyes on Humphrey Bogart, but his classic brand of broodiness is still a personal favorite. There he was, as Linus in Sabrina, starring opposite the sunshine and sparkle of glamour personified - Audrey Hepburn and William Holden – and I was mesmerized by the furrowed brow of the grumpy old guy with a weird name. I still am. Fast forward to one of my High Fidelity-esque Top Fives, When Harry Met Sally..., in which the duo waxes nostalgic about the "best last line of a movie ever" and "the man you've had the greatest sex of your life with." My ears were officially pricked to Casablanca and Bogie.

From his gangster roles to romantic leads, the name Bogart is synonymous with old Hollywood. He remains a style icon and tabloid fodder. His name is a verb. He and his last love. Lauren Bacall, had a vocal disorder named after them. Yet no single cultural reference can encapsulate the charisma of Humphrey Bogart on the silver screen. The Paramount's summer series offers three chances to witness his stardom.

Considered one of the greatest films ever made, Casablanca (1942) leads the list with its legendary cast, including Ingrid Bergman, and famous theme song, "As Time Goes By." Bogart nailed his romantic debut with the famous straight-faced, whiskey-laced, smoke-tinged delivery of the most quoted lines in American cinema. To quote Harry (again), "Of course she wants to stay. Wouldn't you rather be with Humphrey Bogart than the other guy?"

And, of course, there must be more war and romance. Bogart's performance in John Huston's The African Queen (1951) - opposite the powerful and lovely Katharine Hepburn - landed him an Oscar. From one of film's most magnificent years, 1939, comes Dark Victory. Bogart plays a stablehand in a memorable supporting role to Bette Davis' riveting performance as a socialite with a terminal brain tumor.

So I won't be looking at you, kid, when I finally see Bogart on the big screen.

Scrappy Joan Crawford

Joan Crawford made clawing out of the gutter an art form. By the time the San Antonio-born actress with the angular body and streetlamp eyes starred in Mildred Pierce, she'd been doing it onscreen for 20 years. But Mildred Pierce, a single mother who builds a successful chain of restaurants in the 1945 adaptation of James Cain's novel, was different. Other actresses her age, including Bette Davis, had turned down the role, but Crawford won an Oscar for her Mildred, draped in dignity and tasteful furs, her scrapping days over at last.

But there's a nasty little reflux of a daughter in the film who will never be content. It's

hard not to see in Ann Blyth's venomous Veda a shadow of the old, hungry Crawford of the Twenties and Thirties, the gold-digging man-trap who looked ready to dismantle the world and everyone in it, piece by piece, to get her

share. That Crawford, all spidery legs and big eyes, is at her best in the fantastically bitchy comedy, The Women. Adapted from Clare Boothe Luce's acrid stage play and directed by George Cukor with an all-female cast - not a single man appears on screen -The Women follows wealthy women from the beauty salon to the perfume counter to the ladies' room with anthropological spite.

Offstage, men are making the money and cheating on their wives with Crawford's brittle, lanky shopgirl, Crystal Allen. After all, someone has to work the perfume counter. "Look, what have you got to kick

about?" she asks cheated-on Mary Haines, played by MGM's resident saint Norma Shearer. "You've got everything that matters - the name, the position, the money." When Shearer talks of love, Crawford snorts, "You noble wives and mothers bore the brains out of me," and the offscreen rivalry between them gives it a realistic zing. Crawford's a tall glass of something all right, but it ain't water.




Sweet as Candy

It was the late Eighties. It had been some 18 years since Maude taught us how to love. It would be another seven before we'd meet and then complete Mr. Jerry Maguire. But for

a brief moment there, we weren't alone. Writer/director John Hughes broke our romantic doldrums with a little help from John Candy.

Eye candy abounds on the screen. Most of it is forgettable. But Candy's performance as the title character in Hughes' 1989 film Uncle Buck gets me every time. As Buck, the uncouth uncle who has to prove himself to his brother's family, Candy is believably adorable, with a teddy-bearlike quality - yet somehow still able to leave dirty messages on his girlfriend's answering machine. He balances sweetness and



manliness – a sense of humor and a sense of moral right. But it's the creative ways Buck shows he cares that really sets him apart, and Candy delivers those scenes expertly. My favorite? He surprises his nephew (Macaulay Culkin) with a birthday breakfast of giant pancakes so big he has to flip them with a snow shovel. My heart would've hit the floor. And you know, I bet he'd have helped me pick it up. "Ma'am, I believe this is yours?" he'd say. (So damn polite!)

That kindness goes a long way and remains central to so many of Candy's characters. In Hughes' *Planes, Trains and Automobiles* (1987), Candy again has to prove himself – this time as Del Griffith to Neal Page (Steve Martin). Thirty minutes in, Page loses his patience with Griffith. Griffith's response melts Page ... and us.

"I could be a cold-hearted cynic like you, but I don't like to hurt people's feelings. You think what you want about me. I'm not changing. I like me. My wife likes me. My customers like me. 'Cause I'm the real article. What you see is what you get."

My Cool Aunts

I discovered two of my favorite actresses when I was fairly young, in performances that affected me in very different ways. Both Stockard Channing and Dianne Wiest made me want to be close to them, somehow. While I never fantasized about replacing my mom and these two were too old to be my sisters, they totally could have been my cool aunts, there to dispense wisdom and cocktails in my times of need.

My prepubescent self was completely intoxicated by Channing's portrayal of the too-cool-for-school Betty Rizzo, the ringleader of the Pink Ladies in *Grease*. She was worldly (probably because she was 33 when she played this high school senior in the late Seventies), but harbored the same secret vulnerability that takes up residence in the teenage


girl's heart. Plus, with her sly wit ("Bite the weenie, Riz," says Danny. "With relish!" she replies) and gorgeous legs, Channing embodied the confident woman I hoped to become.

Meanwhile, Wiest's wounded, divorced Helen in *Parenthood* (1989) is all squishy accommodation, especially when it comes to her withdrawn son Garry (Joaquin Phoenix, billed here as Leaf Phoenix), but there's an acidic anger penetrating the performance, suggesting that Helen is more than just a beaten-down marshmallow. While she is humiliated when her "electric ear cleaner" is unveiled at a family dinner, that moment brings Helen's commitment to her own pleasure and independence into relief. Her anger, humor, and devotion sealed the deal for teenage me: This was a lady I wanted on my side.

Mad for Tracy



Spencer Tracy is the consummate insideout actor in American cinema. Though he won one of two Oscars for his performance as the Portuguese fisherman in *Captains Courageous*, he reportedly hated feigning an accent and resented the unnaturally curled hair required for the role. Tracy was an actor most comfortable in his own skin, whether he played drama (*Bad Day at Black Rock*), comedy (*Father of the Bride*), or anything in between (*Guess Who's Coming to Dinner*?). The greatest compliment ever paid to him? He appeared to do nothing and everything at the same time.

Tracy received top billing in the 1963 epic, side-splitting extravaganza, *It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World.* Sure, the free-for-all



antics of an ensemble cast of comic pros like Phil Silvers, Ethel Merman, Sid Caesar, and Jonathan Winters scrambling to locate buried treasure define the film. It's mayhem on the grandest scale. But it's Tracy's sly turn as the put-upon police captain with ulterior motives that grounds the movie's madness. It's a pleasure to watch Captain Culpepper's exasperation during a phone call with his annoying wife, or to see the little man finally make his big move. Tracy may not fly an airplane through a billboard or burn down a gas station, but without him, this slapstick masterpiece would be nothing but a series of pratfalls in search of - Steve Davis a movie.

The Weight of Norman Bates

By his own admission, Anthony Perkins would have taken any role, big or small, in any Hitchcock film. But when the Master of Suspense gave him the role of the deranged motel owner Norman Bates and told him, "You are the film," Perkins had no idea how to take it. He hadn't read the script for *Psycho*, and Hitchcock had bought up most copies of the novel it was based on in order to prevent the surprise ending from getting out.

"Anthony Perkins was marvelous, so perfect in the part that it may have damaged his career, and I may have done him harm," confessed Hitchcock. And Perkins did have trouble escaping the weight of Norman Bates. Most people (himself included) would say that he became typecast in those roles and his career never fully recovered. But this never embittered him; in fact, he held Norman Bates close to his heart – it was his favorite part in a long-lasting career, both onscreen and onstage.

What there is no debate about at all is that Perkins delivered one of the most chilling performances in movie history. And a lot of credit goes to Perkins for the character. Hitchcock let his actors improvise on the

Psycho set as long as the cameras were not moved, and it fell to Perkins to figure out Bates' mannerisms and speech.



Central Casting's Girl Next Door

Blond bombshells seduced Hollywood beginning in the silent era with Dolores Costello -Drew Barrymore's grandmother - but brunettes maybe never improved on violet-eyed Elizabeth Taylor. Central casting's girl next door rather than cat on a hot tin roof, Teresa Wright could almost pass for Taylor's baby sister. Sweet, slender, girlish, with a high forehead and perky nose, no one gave pained looks a better run for their frown lines. Great weeper, too. When The Pride of the Yankees turns its inevitable corner with 25 minutes left to go slugger Lou Gehrig (Gary Cooper) stricken with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) – Wright wrings trademark tears alongside her towering leading man and a mostly cornpone script by a pair of pros, Jo Swerling (It's a Wonderful Life) and Herman Mankiewicz (Citizen Kane). She makes it look easy. Debuting in William Wyler's 1941 adaptation of Little Foxes, the



Harlem-born, Jersey-bred actress' next few films were that director's Mrs. Miniver, Sam Wood's The Pride of the Yankees, and the Alfred Hitchcock chiller Shadow of a Doubt. Three of those four gave Wright Academy Award recognition, including a Best Actress nod for Yankees, though she won Best Supporting Actress honors that same year for wartime drama Mrs. Miniver. In fact, Wright did her best work for Wyler opposite Dana Andrews - as well as Fredric March and Myrna Loy - in his 1946 Oscar sweep The Best Years of Our Lives. Extending into (somewhat) modern times with Somewhere in Time, Teresa Wright (1918-2005) would never be served as a tall glass of water by Tinseltown standards, but if this were reel life, she could wipe my brow any day. - Raoul Hernandez

It's every writer's dream to be something more than a messenger. To create something better than ink on a page that deteriorates as breaking bulletins become old news. We want to inspire, preserve - matter.

With her rumination on Bill Haley, p.60, Margaret Moser's filed her last story as a staff writer for the Chronicle.

A fixture of the local music scene since the mid Seventies - as a groupie, backup singer for rock scoundrel **Dino Lee**, organizer of the Austin Music Awards, and scribe for the Austin Sun and the Chronicle - Moser remains inseparable from our city's musical landscape. Her celebrated exit, a love-in rather than a victory lap, began in March at her final AMAs, where she enjoyed a last dance with the Texas Tornados, Jimmie Vaughan, and an entire stage all but bending under the weight of the Austin music scene. A couple of weeks ago at the Continental Club, her retirement party launched with a performance from local Hall of Fame cowpunks the **Hickoids** and landed with a surprise set from light rock luminary Christopher Cross.

Even without **ZZ Top** frontbeard **Billy** Gibbons making a surprise appearance, those live bookends demonstrate the spectral range of artists Moser supported in her long career.

Margaret and I met fall 2011 at Planet K. She'd come in candle shopping and I was playing a compilation of vintage punk called Bloodstains Across Texas. We got to talking about the Nervebreakers and she corrected my assertion that they'd opened for the **Sex** Pistols in our sister city (revisit "Holiday in San Antonio," Jan. 10, 2013). No, she said, they opened the Dallas show.

She was right, of course. I was talking to an authority on early Texas punk. Somewhere in our discussion of Austin bands and her recent **Gourds** cover story, I confided my aspirations of being a writer who didn't have to publish all of his own work. Months later, she wrote about that experience during her reluctant second-run of doing the Chronicle's Music news column, "1-2-Tres-Quatro!"

"The clerk turned out to be remarkably intelligent about music, and I dallied in conversation with him over the carved skull pipes," she wrote, "Not only was he predictably much more knowledgeable about contemporary music than I, he was also very interested in Texas vintage rock history.

"He also had a mustache that would need shaving very soon."

By taking a chance on an unknown writer with a regrettable handlebar mustache, Moser gave me the opportunity to realize my dreams. Without her, I wouldn't be where I am today and I'm not the only person for whom that's true.

Moser's long held a maternal role in the music scene. In what probably comes from her being the eldest of four children in a home split by divorce, she holds a strong sense of family and looks out for the youngsters. It was Moser who first championed Charlie Sexton and Monte Warden when they were barely teens; who saw greatness in the young duo of Gary Clark Jr. and Eve Monsees; who wrote about **Mother Falcon** while most of the members were still in high school; and who championed Residual Kid way back in 2011 when they split from fellow teen hopeful Grace London.

> "Down in San Antonio, I get asked a lot what I've done in Austin and if I had kids." Moser told me on a recent afternoon where we ate tacos and drove around looking at bygone music haunts. "I tell them, 'No I didn't have any kids, but I raised a couple decades of writers and musicians."

Those maternal instincts were evident even in her much reputed groupie days. She'd mommy around her gang of vixens, the Texas

Blondes, and actually hold meetings before they went out, educating the girls about that night's band and playing their music.

"We took the bands shopping, washed clothes, and showed them our favorite enchilada places." she says seriously. "I always considered us a civic group or welcome wagon more than any of the stereotypes people choose to apply to it."

Moser's groupie experiences gave her the confidence - and access - despite never having completed high school, to become a music journalist. Over 33 years at this paper, Moser's worn many hats (mostly fezzes): receptionist, gossip columnist, proofreader, food editor, book editor, staff mom. Above all, she's been known as a loving music writer.

Last fall, Moser, 60 on the issue date of this very Chronicle, received a grim cancer diagnosis. I still cringe when she uses the term "Stage 4 death sentence." She lightens the mood by quoting actress Valerie Harper: "I'm terminal, but not today!"

"And that's really the way I feel," she chuckles. "I have more good days than bad days, and the bad ones really suck, but the good ones I can do whatever I want."


These days, what Moser wants lies in one of the cities of her youth, San Antonio, where she's making a home and history at the **South** Texas Popular Culture Center, which the San Antonio Current recently named "Best Unique Attraction." And she wants to be clear: While the traffic and prices of new Austin have driven her south, Austin's where her heart is.

"C'mon, I love Austin," she smiles. "Why else would I have lived here so long?

Margaret Moser's dedicated her life to local music and, in retirement, will enjoy a legacy beyond that of reporter. She's a leader in our community. As such, there's a surprise in store for her, so meet us today (Thursday) at Third & Nueces, 5:30pm.

Half Notes

- > Two days after Mike & the Moonpies' triumphant return to the White Horse, where they played to a packed dance floor and were joined onstage by What Made Milwaukee Famous frontman Michael Kincaid for a boozy rendition of Hank Jr.'s "Whiskey Bent and Hell Bound," bandleader Mike Harmeier exited his room at La Quinta in Dallas on Sunday morning to find the band's van and trailer, containing all their gear, had been hijacked. Harmeier says the generosity of his fellow musicians has been overwhelming and they'll maintain their busy tour schedule on borrowed equipment. An online fundraiser had brought over \$15,000 in donations at press time. Visit the band's Facebook page to see a complete list of missing gear.
- > An estimated 5,200 Latin music fans flocked to Fiesta Gardens on Saturday for Pachanga Fest, up 30% from last year, according to founder Rich Garza. The largest draws of Pachanga's non-traditional lineup, which ranged from Puerto Rican garage rock to Andean dub psych, were Mexican-American songbird Julieta Venegas and rowdy Monterrey rock/ska/rap crew El Gran Silencio. Garza characterized the growing fan demographic as the Chronicle/KUTX crowd and the El Mundo/Latino 102.7 contingent. "That's an interesting mix of people to bring together for a party," he offered. Garza scaled back his annual Latin gathering this year to a single-day event.

Sinclair and Otis the Destroyer, for whom next Thursday's 101X Homegrown Live concert at Mohawk serves as a dual EP release show. Sinclair has long performed as Frank **Smith**, but reverted to his legal name on an artful new indie rock offering, Pretty Girls. Similarly, guitarist-songwriter Taylor Wilkins recently scrapped his group the **Couch** to form Otis the Destroyer, which received studio advisement from White Denim's James Petralli on new EP Dark Arts.
- Austin's synthesizer superstore, Switched On, will relocate to larger digs at 2400 E. Cesar Chavez. The specialty shop and repair service has outgrown the small storefront at on East 11th its held since opening in 2010. A synth mecca boasting an eye-bugging selection of keyboards, effects modules, drum machines, and other electronic musical tools, Switched On is a popular attraction for bands touring through Austin. Increased square footage will allow the business to consolidate, and they'll resume hosting classes and workshops. Visit their new storefront June 1, with a grand opening party on June 7.

When the Clock Strikes 12

Bill Haley, the father of rock & roll?

In 2007, Pete Best performed Downtown on the outdoor stage of Threadgill's World Headquarters. You of a certain age remember the drummer - the Beatle who wasn't John, Paul, George, or Ringo. The Liverpudlians' initial backbeat, 1960-62, he'd been a handsome devil as a young man and remained fit for the 45 years that followed, playing songs he'd performed and recorded with the band.

He had mastered his craft in Hamburg with the leather-wearing rockers by the time he was fired on the cusp of the group's meteoric ascent. In Austin, after the show, he conducted a congenial meet and greet, posing for pictures with fans and signing posters. Murky reasons given for his exit from the Beatles became a poignant reality while watching him work the crowd of a couple hundred. What's it like to stand within a hair's breadth of unimaginable success, completely shadowed by circumstance?

Ask Bill Haley.

That's impossible, of course, since Haley died on February 9, 1981, seven months before the Austin Chronicle's debut issue. Unlike Best, Haley did taste success, yet he died in South Texas - Harlingen - haunted, embittered, and neglected. The man who cut the first rock & roll single to top the Billboard charts and sell a million records wasn't even inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame's inaugural class five

Worse, Haley bought into the pointless argument of who invented rock & roll, believing he deserved the title. He had a legit claim, too, having recorded the genre's first bona fide anthem, "Rock Around the Clock." The other firsts he deserves credit for have been marginalized along with his memory.


Yet, of all the myths and maybes surrounding Haley, one detail rings true: Bill Haley & His Comets were the first rock & roll band. While Chuck Berry, Elvis Presley, Little Richard, Fats Domino, and Jerry Lee Lewis dreamed big in 1951, prototype rock bands led by Haley charted hits.

When the Clock Strikes One

It was a double rim shot heard round the world, followed by Haley's famous count off, "One, two, three o'clock, four o'clock rock," and it very nearly faded into obscurity.

As the B-side of "Thirteen Women (and Only One Man in Town)," the song, "(We're Gonna) Rock Around the Clock," first charted in early 1954. The single didn't reach No. 1, but its bluesy jump beat attracted the attention of teens bored with their parents' Benny Goodman and Frank Sinatra records.

Late that same year, while visiting the home of actor Glenn Ford, film director Richard Brooks was handed some 45s from the collection of the actor's teenage son.



Who knows what demons encroached on Halev's battered mind that final night in Harlingen, before a friend found his cold body the next day.

Among the titles that caught Brooks' ear was "Rock Around the Clock" by Bill Haley & His Comets. This tune, decided the filmmaker, fit his new feature about inner-city kids in high school, The Blackboard Jungle, starring Glenn Ford.

After a cornball intro about juvenile delinquency set to light, jazzy drums, the movie title splashed across the screen. "Put your glad rags on and join me, hon," invited Haley, and join him they did - by the millions. "Rock Around the Clock" leapt off the screen and onto record players, radios, and jukeboxes like nothing before. Prior to his death in 1993, iconoclast Frank Zappa often cited the film's debut in March 1955 and the effect of "Rock Around the Clock" on young theatregoers.

"I didn't care if Bill Haley was white or sincere," declared Zappa. "He was playing the teenage National Anthem and it was loud. I was jumping up and down [Although the film] had the old people winning in the end, it represented an endorsement. 'They have made a movie about us, therefore we exist."

The big beat demanded a new moniker, something more specific than "western bop" and "cowboy jive." History credits radio deejay Alan Freed with popularizing the phrase "rock & roll," making a crude reference to sex socially acceptable. Moreover, The Blackboard Jungle helped cement the association of rock & roll with juvenile delinquency.

Shake. Rattle & Roll

After the success of the film, Bill Haley & His Comets signed on to tour with "The Biggest Rock & Roll Show of 1956," the only white act on a bill that included the Platters, Drifters, Bo Diddley, Big Joe Turner, LaVern Baker, and Frankie Lymon & the Teenagers. The latter finished the first half, and the Comets closed the second to wild applause and dancing in the aisles.

In 1957, the band stormed England the way the Beatles would take America in

1964. Across the Atlantic, riots and mayhem followed Comets' gigs, English newspapers crowing headlines like, "1,000 Crazed Teenagers Jive Down Main Street After Cinema Riot," while politicians decried "rock & roll hooliganism." Down under, 300,000 Australians greeted the Yanks with signs reading, "The King Is Here!" Haley & His Comets rocked around not just the clock, but the world.

For starters, they were a pro outfit. The Michigan-born Haley led Western swing bands beginning at the age of 15. As Bill Haley & the Saddlemen, he recorded Jackie Brenston's "Rocket 88" in 1951 and "Rock the Joint" a year later. By 1953, the Comets' "Crazy Man, Crazy" laid the groundwork for "Rock Around the Clock." He followed it with "Shake, Rattle and Roll," paying tribute to Big Joe Turner. In 1956, he popularized "See You Later, Alligator" in the American lexicon.

Besides forming the first rock & roll band, the Comets, and earning the first gold record for a rock & roll song, Haley also ruled as the first bandleader to write and publish his music. In other words, he reached the national charts with music he wrote and recorded, cashing in by owning his own music publishing company and record label. Although he was the first white artist elected as the "Rhythm & Blues Personality of the Year," he preferred to call himself the father of rock & roll.

Veteran music critic John Swenson qualified the self-coronation by subtitling his 1983 Haley biography "The Extraordinary Life and Career of the World's First Rock & Roll Idol," which falls in line with the fact that after triumphant international tours in 1957, Haley arrived back in the U.S. to little fanfare and a usurper to his throne. By then, Elvis Presley had racked up nine No. 1 smashes, his smoldering visage decorating new novelty publications aimed at teens, such as 16 Magazine (revisit "Dreamsville," Nov. 30, 2007). The iconic "Million Dollar Quartet" photo of Presley, Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis, and Carl Perkins debuted in 16.

For all his meteoric rise and worldwide following, Haley now trailed behind Presley and the new crop of slick young singers. His trademark kiss curl looked dated and he'd never been especially photogenic: tall but schlubby, introverted, shy about his blind eye, married, and generally looking and acting square in a world of Brylcreem pretty boys like Ricky Nelson. And just when media began focusing on rock & rollers, Haley backed away from press. His next recording projects of hopped-up international folk songs were followed by a country album that stiffed.

It didn't help that the IRS had its hand out for back taxes; managerial mishandling of finances soon forced Haley to close his publishing business. German author Otto Fuchs' recently reissued book, Bill Haley: Father of Rock & Roll, suggests that by that time, "Since record sales had fallen in the [Sixties], the band increasingly depended on income from live shows."

Bill Haley & His Comets still enjoyed a modicum of popularity as a nostalgia act, playing two-week engagements at nightclubs like San Antonio's Tiffany Lounge in 1964. Yet, the frontman preferred playing outside the States where taxes were more forgiving. He especially liked the way Mexico felt so laid-back and how its people embraced him and his music.

Royal Command Performance

Bill Haley's career wasn't over, but important parts were breaking down. His first marriage went down the drain when wifeto-be number two turned up pregnant. By the time he relocated to Mexico in 1961, that marriage foundered as well. When Haley reluctantly found himself paired onstage with an attractive Latina singer named Martha Velasco, the third time proved to be the fabled charm.

His band introduced the Twist dance craze to Mexico as the Beatles invaded America. Films, concerts, and recordings for the Orfeón and Dimsa labels meant that the Seventies began well for Haley, particularly when the American Graffiti soundtrack made "Rock Around the Clock" quintessential. Haley re-recorded the single in 1974 for use on a new TV show, Happy Days, and the song climbed the charts with that irresistible double rim shot one more time.

Dates and recordings south of the border, plus European tours, kept him busy through the decade. In 1979, Haley played a Royal Command Performance for the queen. This came as no surprise, for he long remained a favorite in England, especially among the Teddy Boys, who'd followed him since the Fifties.

Call it the Big in Europe syndrome, but here's a provocative thought espoused by Otto Fuchs:

"Rockabilly veterans such as Charlie Feathers, Johnny Powers, Mac Curtis, Johnny Carroll, Hank Mizell, etc., who are footnotes in the rock & roll history of the U.S., were rediscovered at first in Britain. then in Continental Europe during a great rockabilly revival in the 1970s. [They becamel household names in Europe, paying the way for rockabilly revivalist bands

who brought social liberty to our shores."

Some of the mystery of Haley's erratic behavior in the final years of his life has been explained.

For "Falling Comet," Austinite Michael Hall scored the first interview ever with Halev's widow Martha in 2011 for Texas Monthly. The Wild Seeds' frontman characterized Haley as deviled by drink, paranoia, and the ghosts of his former success. Hall's description of Haley's contradictory behavior, where he'd sit in a Sambo's restaurant in Harlingen drinking coffee and humming "Rock Around the Clock" for attention, resonate painfully as true:







WHERE MUSIC STILL MATTERS



Megafauna Maximalist (Danimal Kingdom)

Honing its vision to a skin-flaying edge on third long-player Maximalist, Austin threesome Megafauna blends genres the way a good cook melds ingredients. Dani Neff employs multiple genre-licious ingredients to make each track simultaneously punchy, complex, and catchy, while her prodigious six-string technique shines brighter than the sun. In a town full of guitar wizards, she's the philosopher's stone. Better still, her shred's in thrall to her maturing songsmithery. "This Town" floats atop Zack Humphrey's tricky time signature and bassist Greg Yancey's busy thrumming, but Neff's licks catch the ear and spin your head. "Hug From a Robot" and "Haunted Factory" kiss the prog frog with more tongue than other cuts, but showcase memorable melodies as much as knuckle-cracking riffs. "Touch the Lion" rides rumbling grunge spiked with fretboard burning, but the point isn't to marvel at Neff's skill so much as play air guitar along with it. Not everything sets the table for smorgasbord; "Time to Go" dispenses with foofaraw to just rock the fuck out, while "Carnie Girl" kicks away the frills and strips all the way down to its skivvies. No matter how finger-busting the hook or knotty the rhythm, Megafauna's Maximalist keeps the spotlight where it belongs - not the head but the heart.

Doug Strahan Coal Black Dreams, **Late Night Schemes** (Bloodchili Records)

After years as both the garage blues-bashin' Chili Cold Blood and more countrified Moonhangers,

this gritty local trio decided guitarist/vocalist Doug Strahan should go solo - with the same supporting cast: Ethan Shaw engineering and playing bass, steel guitar, and banjo, and Matt Puryear on drums. Gone "solo," Strahan revives the lonesome, orn'ry spirit of outlaw country. only this strain owes as much to Gram Parsons and the Flying Burrito Brothers as Waylon Jennings and Willie Nelson. Opener "Good Crosswinds," an electric, piano-drenched gospel

ballad about love and alcohol that contributes the album's title, snakes crunchy blues like a cobra on absinthe, while "I'll Make It Rain" finds the frontman's Waylon-esque phaseshifted rhythm guitar underpinned by disco drums. In between there's pure mountain music ("So Damn Tired"), even some Stonesy rockin' ("Keep It on the Record"). Waylon wouldn't have done it this way, but he'd have approved.

Grevhounds Accumulator (Ardent)

Mixed and remastered from DIY releases at the behest of Ardent Records, the label arm of the famed Memphis recording studio that once

rolled tape for Texas luminaries ZZ Top and the Vaughan brothers, Accumulator marks the first of three albums from guitarist Andrew Trube and organist Anthony Ferrell. This collaborative debut between the imprint and Greyhounds is the only one forecast to repurpose past recordings, so some might remember these funk/ blues practitioners' cooled-out lead single "What's on Your Mind" and "Yours to Steal" from 2011 four-song stopover Spring Training. Ditto for hints of 2009's ¡No Más! via the raw hum of "Get Back" and syncopated claps on "All Over but the Shoutin'." Trube and Farrell split the bill stylishly with standards from the duo's Continental Club Gallery residency ("Yeah Yeah Yeah," "You're Gone"), and the Delta blues ethos of "Lone Rider" and "I Remember," a track that flexes Ferrell's textured coo while fitting firmly into a pop template.

Full Service Carousel

Presale customers of Full Service's ninth studio LP received regionally specific tree samplings with this disc. That loving connection to nature reveals itself immediately on Carousel, with opening pair "Honeybee" and "Evergreen" setting love stories amongst the flora and fauna. Downplaying the reggae and metal influences of previous efforts and finding a comfortable zone of smooth, sunny



eclectic rock, the local grassroots quartet are liberated to employ cooing harmonies that lead into spring-heeled choruses where singer Hoag Kepner's tender voice can hang on a

soulful line such as the Beatles-quality hook of "Huge Gray Blue." With a band like Full Service, fan-loving, tree-planting, communityminded posi-rockers that they are, inspiration remains the end goal, but I'd argue that the best moments on Carousel – the stony melodica creeping into "Two Old Birds," the unexpected shred solo on "Ba Da Ba," and the fluttering, motormouth intro on "Circus Freak" - occur when they get strange.

Machine Don't Lie MACHINE DON'T LIE **Nobody Panic**

Ben Mallott's debut salvo, 2008's Look Good, Feel Good, delivered an eclectic and versatile backing to his soft yet gritty, Ray



LaMontagne-esque tenor. Taking time off to regroup, the local songwriter returns with a full quintet project, Machine Don't Lie. His breathy drawl still drives the tunes, but the band solidifies his sound in a more indie-rock style. The racing rhythm and soulful swoon of "Shadows" balances against the softer lilt of "As We Please" and spitting percussive pop of "Cherry Bomb," while "Don't Look Back" builds to a trumpet-laced climax. Though middisc triptych "Accidental Child," "Tonight," and "Rain Song" fall flatter, the exuberant choral burst of "Shoes" and swagger of "Travis Co. Jail" lift Nobody Panic in time for short, subtle closers "Josephine" and "One and All." Whether or not Machine Don't Lie provides the right fit for Mallott, he remains one of Austin's most compelling voices.

Brainclub Vol. II (Holodeck)

Compiled by Pure X's Jesse Jenkins and Kyle Dixon of Survive, Holodeck's second Brainclub collection offers a heady overview of Austin's electronic music subculture. Analog archeology is the unifying element here, the lab coatclad wonderment of electronic music's pioneer days reimagined through the prism of retro-futurism. Taking structural cues from the minimalist tradition, seven instrumentals make the most of austerity and repetition, slowly evolving into distinctive, electro-mechanical mantras. Bill Converse's "Baboonatic" pits vintage TR-808 rhythms against a proto-techno synth phrase that wouldn't be out of place in a late-Seventies production music library. Krallen's "Hoar" mines pure dystopian horror with a groaning carousel warble that becomes more foreboding with each revolution. Malcolm Elijah from Silent Diane offers the contemplative "Emerald Diosphere Milxca," which bears modernized familiarity to the madcap outer space fantasias of Joe Meek. Then the rubbery, synthetic tribal drum pattern that drives Ex-Person's "Kwenda" brings us back to Earth. A worthy travelogue that warrants further investigation. ★★★



her first release in five vears, and Where You Go settles into a laidback ethos blasted with a summery, Barton Springs vibe. A tribute to the couple's

daughters Lulu and Paris, the title track and "Raincoat" fit in neatly with adult contemporary songstresses like Sarah Bareilles and Ingrid Michaelson, piano ballads nuanced by her delicate, controlled vox. All that was left, besides the six dozen people in attendance, was fading memories of glad rags, fun 'til the clock struck one, and a double rim shot.





Recurring Theme: An unnamed "gangland" bomber was killed in March in Dublin, Ireland, when the payload exploded prematurely. The detonation occurred on the morning of March 30, which marked the daylight saving time change in Ireland, and police concluded that, most likely, the bomber had forgotten to set the timer ahead that morning, which would have given him up to 60 more minutes to plant the bomb and leave. (In 1999, two Palestinians, operating on West Bank time, but carrying bombs to the Israeli cities Haifa and Tiberius, which had already advanced their clocks that morning, were blown up - along with only one bystander instead of the dozens or hundreds planned for.)

......

PRICE OF FRIENDSHIP

"Whoever said, 'Money can't buy you friends' clearly hasn't been on the Internet recently," wrote The New York Times in April, pointing to various social media support services that create online superstars by augmenting one's Facebook "friends," Twitter "followers," and Instagram "likes." The reporter described how, by paying a company \$5, for example, he immediately acquired 4,000 "friends," and had he splurged for \$3,700, could have had a million on his Instagram photo account. Such services have been around for two years, but earlier, cruder versions (sometimes, just unmonitored email addresses) are now sophisticated "bots" groups of computer code created on algorithm farms in India and elsewhere - that "behave" on social media with original messaging (often "drivel," wrote the Times) as if they were real people.

THE ENTREPRENEURIAL SPIRIT

We All Scream: 1) In April, Häagen-Dazs announced it will introduce two new ice creams (thankfully, only in Japan): carrot orange (with bits of pulp and peel) and tomato cherry (made from tomato paste). 2) A South Wales ice cream maker (Lick Me I'm Delicious) announced in April that it has perfected an ice cream containing about 25mg of Viagra per scoop (though it is not yet generally available).

Marketing Challenges: 1) In January, London's Daily Telegraph found three British companies in competition to sell deodorant supposedly made especially for women's breasts. According to one, Fresh Body, "We're replacing 'swoobs' - dreaded boob sweat with smiles." 2) Owner Christian Ingber recently opened a sandwich shop in Gothenburg, Sweden, named A Fucking Awesome Sandwich. An American expatriate told Stockholm's The Local news service that Swedes think English "curse words" are "cute and charming."

SCIENCE FAIR

Medical Marvels: 1) China's Chengdu Commercial Daily reported in March that Liu Yougang, 23, finally had surgery to remove that whistle he had swallowed when he was 9. He had been experiencing worsened breathing - and had been making "shrill whistle sounds" nightly after falling asleep. 2) London's Daily Star featured Sarah Beal, 43, of Arley, Warwickshire, England, in a March story demonstrating her skin condition in which writing words on her skin makes it puff up for about an hour before it recedes. It is referred to by doctors as the "Etch A Sketch condition" (formally, dermatographia), and despite occasional pain, she described it as "cool" and a "party trick."

The Job of the Researcher: Cornell University graduate student Michael Smith, disappointed at the paucity of research on the

pain of honeybee stings, decided to evaluate the stings himself (but in line with the Helsinki Declaration of 1975 on safe selfexperimentation). Smith's protocols required five stings a day on various body locations for 38 days - at least three on each of 25 body areas. The worst, according to his pain index, were the nostril (9.0) and the upper lip (8.7).

North Carolina's Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine is already well-known to "News of the Weird" readers for creating functional organs in the lab (most notably, perhaps, growing a human bladder and a rabbit's penis). In an April article in The Lancet, the program announced that it had implanted artificial vaginas in four women in the U.S. A functioning vagina, the director told BBC News, "is a very important thing."

LEADING ECONOMIC INDICATORS

While Medicare continues to be among the most costly federal services, and U.S. doctors continue to drop out of the program because of paltry fees for some procedures, other specialists are rewarded with such outsized compensation that almost 4,000 physicians were paid \$1 million or more for 2012 and about 350 of those totaled nearly \$1.5 billion, according to Medicare records released in April 2014. Ophthalmologist Salomon Melgen of West Palm Beach, Fla., took in more than \$20 million and treated 645 Medicare patients with a total of 37,000 injectable doses of Lucentis (a much more expensive drug than the popularly regarded equivalent, Avastin), according to Business Insider. (In fact, taxpayers could have saved more than \$11 million with Avastin on Melgen's billings alone, according to an April Washington Post analysis.)

Visitors to the New York City office of Clear Channel radio station chairman Bob Pittman are greeted exotically as they step off the elevator by a "tunnel" of "fine mist." However, a spokeswoman told a New York Post reporter in March that it "isn't for cooling or humidifying," but to impress advertisers, in that Clear Channel knows how to project the advertiser's logo against the mist. (Clear Channel, the Post reported, is \$21 billion in debt and has laid off "thousands" of employees.)

INTELLIGENT DESIGN

Par-tee! 1) In a springtime rite in Narcisse, Manitoba, tens of thousands of red-sided garter snakes slithered out of pits in March so that writhing males could hook up with "pheromone-spewing" females. London's Daily Mail called it the largest gathering of snakes on the planet – with balls of males wrapped around females. 2) Once again this year, the Toads on Roads charity in Sleaford, England, called for volunteers in February to police a highway where post-hibernating female toads carry horny males on their backs across a road to mate in marshes. Without help, said the charity, up to two-thirds of the amorous toads would not survive oncoming cars.







Day Trips

Rockets flying over Willow City this weekend won't be fired in anger. It's the annual invasion of high school students launching their custom-built missiles high into the blue sky of the Texas Hill Country.

Maybe watching the silver science projects scream toward the clouds isn't on the scale of a NASA launch, but it is pretty exciting. The 8-foot-tall rockets take off from their cow-pasture launching pads, streak across the sky, and then gently parachute back to Earth.

The unexpected can happen and spectators are kept a respectable distance from the rockets, but not too far to enjoy the thrill of flight. Usually the worst that happens is the 30-minute wait between launches is extended to excruciating lengths. Fortunately, there are activities and the announcer fills in the time with information about the rockets and the students who built them.

This year, 30 high schools will launch 80 rockets, 20 more rockets than last year, as part of the SystemsGo Aeroscience classroom program. Statewide, 46 schools participate in the program that teaches hands-on skills. The course began at nearby Fredericksburg High School in 1996.

The student rockets lift 35-pound payloads up to 100,000 feet into the air Thursday through Sunday, May 15-18, from 8:30am to 5:30pm. The event is free and open to the public, but preregistration is recommended. Go to www.systemsgo.org for details. Austin's Akins High School will launch its rocket on Saturday morning.

The **Austin Aztex** got their 2014 season off to a flying start Saturday night, with a comprehensive **5-0** win (I called that score in my preview), featuring five different goal-scorers, and two real stunners. The first one, in the 10th minute, started with a gorgeously hit long through ball into the corner by **Walker Hume** (one of the 6-foot-5-inch twins from Westlake), a perfect cross to the far post by new guy **Cruz Oronos**, volleyed into the net by **Chuy Cortes** ("Chuy, Chuy, Chuy, oy, oy, oy"). And the fourth, still in the first half, was pure skill from **Tony Rocha**, a 20-year-old out of Klein Oak High in Houston: spinning out of a hard tackle at the edge of the penalty area, leaving two defenders sprawling, and beating the goalie from 15 yards out, ever so coolly. Actually, the whole team looked very calm and efficient; they had most of the possession, worked the ball around, and scored on all four shots they took in the first half (**Sito Seoane** and **Andres Cuero** doing the honors, with **Adam Black** adding one in the second half).

Man of the match: Tony Rocha. No. 2 Star: Walker Hume. No. 3 Star: Danny Frid. The Aztex are on the road this weekend; the next home game is May 24 against the Mississippi Brilla.

Meanwhile, as we go to press, the Aztex are playing the **NTX Rayados** in the **U.S. Open Cup** second round; the winner gets a May 28 date with the NASL's **San Antonio Scorpions**, which would be a blast, and the winner of that one will likely play either **Houston Dynamo** or **FC Dallas** in June.

Elsewhere, the **European** season is just about over, and **World Cup** kickoff is just four weeks off (June 12). U.S. coach **Jurgen Klinsmann** named his 30-man training camp roster this week, and the second-guessing and handicapping begins; the most notable exclusion was forward/winger **Eddie Johnson**, who scored critical goals in the qualifying campaign but has struggled recently in MLS. With the three goalies set, that leaves 27 field players vying for 20 roster positions, and 11 of those hopefuls are **defenders**, which gives you an idea what Klinsmann sees as his weak link. The U.S. will play three exhibition games starting May 27, before heading down to Brazil.



Locke

Tom Hardy has been working steadily in British film and television for nearly 15 years, but American audiences largely know his special

brand of mesmerism via secondary roles: as the villainous Bane with the voice box of doom in *The Dark Knight Rises*, the sad-Lothario secret agent Ricki Tarr in *Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy, Inception's* smooth criminal, *Lawless'* stoic bootlegger. (Of the McG abomination *This Means War*, a rare dance with disposable Hollywood product, we'll say no more.) Hardy's newest film, *Locke*, won't court a kernel of the audience that popped to the last Batman movie, but it's a far better showcase of the actor's talents. Written and directed by Steven Knight

(who also penned *Dirty Pretty*


Things and Eastern Promises; he's good with grim), Locke has the feel of a one-act, one-man play, with its swift running time and limited scope.

But then, it would never work onstage, because the whole thing takes place inside a car, and that car – a moving weapon so taken for granted we invent a hundred other things to do while driving – is essential to the film's grosgrain of mundaneness and bated-breath suspense.

Hardy plays Ivan Locke, a family man and construction foreman battling a cold as he drives alone on an at-first mysterious mission. The little gray cells (not to mention those tiny, intuitive hairs on the back

of the neck) prick at the welcome call to action, tasked to piece together the source of conflict between Locke and a series of callers (heard but never seen), from his boss to his wife to a hospital in London. But kick out the legs of the plot engine – the first-watch uncertainty of where Locke is going and why – and what sticks is its stirring portrait of a detail-oriented man trying to stay true to his self-defined code of honor. Locke also delivers a couple of soliloquies to his dead dad. Hardy has a field day with them, ghosting Richard

Burton's melodious Welsh accent and percolating rage, but it's a touch theatrical: Locke's inner roil is already plenty apparent without these "thinking out loud" moments.

THE GERMAN DOCTOR

D: Lucía Puenzo; with Àlex Brendemühl, Natalia Oreiro, Florencia Bado, Diego Peretti, Elena Roger, Guillermo Pfening. (PG-13, 93 min., subtitled)

This Argentinian film uses that country's dark history as a haven for escaped Nazi war criminals as fodder for its atmospheric tale. Set in 1960 and told from the perspective of 12-year-old Lilith (Bado), who is bright and curious but underdeveloped for her age, The German Doctor reminds us that appearances may be deceiving. That solicitous doctor (Brendemühl), whom you invite to be the first guest in your newly opened hotel, may not be exactly who he seems. There may be a reason he now works with cattle instead of human beings in experiments designed to perfect the animals' genetic breeding with injections of growth hormones. But for her physical growth, the doctor considers Lilith to be a "perfect specimen," who would greatly benefit from his treatments. Lilith's mother Eva (Oreiro), who is pregnant with twins, welcomes the good doctor's ministrations, although her husband Enzo (Peretti) remains suspicious.

As members of the audience, we're already privy to the fact that this doctor is the infamous Josef Mengele, the Angel of Death behind the Third Reich's horrific experiments in genetic engineering. We see his detailed notebooks over the film's opening credits, and wait with baited breath for these Argentine innocents to catch up with what we, the audience, already know. But first, we must plod through overly obvious scenes which show Enzo as distrustful of this stranger but unable to put his finger on why. Enzo is a tinkerer who makes porcelain dolls, and is proud of the fact that no two are alike. He bristles when the doctor wants to invest in the dolls and have them mass-produced. We also witness the ways in which Lilith is shamed and ostracized by her classmates for her small stature, and realize the name-calling is only steps away from the state-sanctioned bullying that took place in

Writer/director Lucía Puenzo (XXY) has a nice feel for her characters and, especially, the viewpoint of adolescent Lilith. But by giving away the story's big reveal at the very beginning, it infuses the film with a potent sense of dread rather than suspense. As Lilith, newcomer Florencia Bado makes a strong impression in her first screen role. But you just want to reach out and shake her and tell her that children are cruel, beauty comes from within, and to run as fast as her tiny legs will carry her and get away from the clutches of this beguiling monster.

♥ GOD'S POCKET

D: John Slattery; with Philip Seymour Hoffman, Christina Hendricks, John Turturro, Richard Jenkins, Eddie Marsan, Caleb Landry Jones, Peter Gerety, Joyce Van Patten, Sophia Takal. (R, 88 min.)

We come away with a strong sense of place and the characters who inhabit it in actor John Slattery's debut as a film director. The drama may not be as focused as we might like, but Slattery's outstanding gallery of actors make this an ensemble piece that commands our attention: These dead-end

characters stick out like bas reliefs in the community framework.

Adapted by Slattery and Alex Metcalf from Pete Dexter's first novel, God's Pocket is a rather dark and hopeless tale that takes its title from the depressed, working-class neighborhood of Philadelphia that the storytellers bring to life. An opening voiceover describes the community's residents as lifers who live, work, marry, follow their sports teams, and die all within the boundaries of their neighborhood. New generations come and go, and nobody trusts anyone from outside the neighborhood. Even Mickey Scarpato (Hoffman), a low-level criminal who seems to be loved by everybody, can be regarded as an outsider since he's only lived in God's Pocket for the 17 years he's been married to Jeanie (Hendricks - Slattery's castmate from Mad Men).

The voiceover we hear over the opening sequence belongs to the alcoholic newspaper columnist Richard Shellburn (Jenkins), who's been writing about this neighborhood for the last 20 years - though, in truth, he does more drinking than writing these days. The film opens at a funeral, and then flashes back to the preceding three days to reveal the events that led to this moment. The kid being put to rest (Jones) was a rotten piece of work, who appears not to be missed by anyone other than his mother Jeanie. Yet his death in a "workplace accident" isn't especially plausible either. Mickey just wants to come up with the cash needed to pay for the funeral that's being arranged by the mortician Smilin' Jack (Marsan), but one scheme after another leaves him more flat broke than he was before. By his side through it all is his friend Bird (Turturro), who's in heavy debt to some serious gangsters.

God's Pocket continually cuts among these various characters and their predicaments, which creates a jumpy overall rhythm. The viewer is never sure which storyline is the dominant one, although Hoffman's Mickey is the unifying thread running through it all. Mickey is the kind of schlubby loser that Philip Seymour Hoffman excelled at playing, especially in small, indie projects such as this one. As one of the actor's last completed projects, God's Pocket will serve, no doubt, as a better epitaph than his work in the upcoming episodes of The Hunger Games.

GODZILLA

D: Gareth Edwards; with Aaron Taylor-Johnson, Ken Watanabe, Bryan Cranston, Elizabeth Olsen, Sally Hawkins, Juliette Binoche, David Strathairn, Richard T. Jones, Victor Rasuk, Carson Bolde. (PG-13, 123 min.)

Godzilla, cinema's most beloved and feared monster, returns once more to save humanity from its own arrogance, as well as a couple of new radioactive MUTOs (Massive Unidentified Terrestrial Organisms). This Hollywood monster epic manages to honor the creature's Japanese Atomic Age origin story and obliterate the memory of Roland Emmerich's disappointing 1998 revival. The monster mash proves to be a lot of fun once it gets going and we watch as cities are tromped to bits, but the film's human drama only bogs things down with expository dialogue between the scientists (Watanabe and Hawkins) who track the MUTOs from continent to continent, and a focal family (TaylorJohnson, Olsen, and Bolde) who struggle to reunite amid the mayhem.

Signing on Gareth Edwards to direct this huge Hollywood tent-pole turned out to be a smart decision, even though the relatively inexperienced Edwards had only directed one other feature: the micro-budgeted Monsters. for which he created all the effects himself. Here Edwards marshals all the 3-D creature effects admirably, but the human interactions are flat and uninvolving. The thundering music score by Alexandre Desplat is an atypical one for this composer and often competes with rather than enhances the action.

A prologue set in 1999 Japan, in which a nuclear plant manager (Cranston) tries to prevent a meltdown in the reactors, is a clear parallel to the recent Fukushima tragedy. Then jumping 15 years into the future, that plant manager's son (Taylor-Johnson) has grown into a bomb-detonation expert for the U.S. military, who is based in San Francisco where he lives with his wife (Olsen) and young son (Bolde). He's quickly called back to Japan to bail out his father, who has been caught trespassing in the quarantined zone of the plant explosion. Presumed to be crazed with grief over the meltdown and loss of his wife (a toobriefly-seen Binoche), no one takes his talk of another impending crisis seriously. Meanwhile the scientists traipse from locale to locale as they deductively try to make sense of the revived MUTO activity, and are joined by the U.S. military's point man (Strathairn).

This Godzilla befits our cinematic era of 3-D, digital special effects (though it's a bit surprising that the 3-D is never used to reach out into the audience and thwack viewers with the monsters' limbs or pincers or spew of fire). It's a creature feature for the Subatomic Age.

LEGENDS OF OZ: DOROTHY'S RETURN

According to the Library of Congress, 1939's The Wizard of Oz has been seen by more viewers than any other movie, a piece of trivia I mulled over as the lights went down in the theatre and a couple with four small children came in, thus upping the attendance to seven. The stories that L. Frank Baum wrote have been spun off, remade, and adapted into numerous incarnations ever since that first novel was published over 100 years ago, and it seems they will continue to do so with wildly varying results. Which brings us to Legends of Oz: Dorothy's Return, the title (specifically the colon in the title) being an unfortunate harbinger of future entries.

Based on the children's book by Baum's great-grandson, Roger S. Baum, this animated film starts off with Dorothy (Michele) awakening back in Kansas after ridding Oz of that pesky Wicked Witch of the West, only to find that not even a day has passed since embarking on her adventures on the yellow brick road (time moves differently in Oz, you see, and that's all the film has to say about that). The aftermath of the tornado that sent her there has ravaged the Kansas town, and she and Aunt Em (Adams) are threatened with eviction, but all that is quickly forgotten when a magical rainbow mover (don't ask) sends Dorothy and Toto back to Oz. The Scarecrow (Aykroyd), the Lion (Belushi), and the Tin Man (Grammer) have been kidnapped by the Wicked Witch's brother, the Jester (Short), and he seeks to rule the land by turning everyone into helpless marionettes, and only Dorothy can save them. Along the way, she picks up some new traveling companions, who serve as both mirthless comic relief and romantic subplot fodder, and things pretty much play out as expected.

Carping on a film clearly targeted to 5-yearolds might seem unjust, but the filmmakers go about their business in such a lazy fashion that the viewer can't help but feel irritated by the whole ordeal. The animation style is about as bland as it gets, the songs are cloying, and the 3-D is an obvious afterthought. There are no lessons learned here, either, unless you count the whole absolute power corrupts absolutely business, and what preschooler doesn't need a lesson in that timeless adage? Bring me my ruby slippers, Toto, we're getting the hell out of here. - Josh Kupecki


MILLION DOLLAR ARM

D: Craig Gillespie: with Jon Hamm, Suraj Sharma, Madhur Mittal, Aasif Mandvi, Pitobash, Darshan Jariwala, Lake Bell, Alan Arkin, Bill Paxton. (PG, 123 min.)

A sports agent, looking straight into the camera, makes a silky pitch to a prospective client: "You deserve to cash in." We're in familiar territory here - that sports agent, JB Bernstein, is played by Jon Hamm, who we've been watching seduce clients for years as a star ad man on Mad Men. But then Hamm exhales shakily, his flop sweat comes into focus, and we realize this was just a practice run, delivered to his partner Aash (Aasif Mandvi) at a boutique agency that's about one bounced check away from shutting down. JB doesn't land the account, but after a latenight beer binge spent toggling back and forth between a televised cricket match and Susan Boyle's breakthrough on Britain's Got Talent, he does alight on a creative solution: He'll go to India, throw a contest to find a couple of promising cricket bowlers, and turn them into major-league pitchers.

Based on a true story, Bernstein's scheme - called the Million Dollar Arm (if any of the contest entrants are signed to a team, they'll receive a million-dollar bonus) – is a brilliant marketing strategy to tap one billion new baseball fans in India, but this is a Disney movie, so the messaging mostly sticks to the timeless triumph of the underdog. (Which isn't to say studio execs aren't gleefully anticipating one billion potential movie ticket buyers, too.) The India set-pieces are vibrantly shot (by Gyula Pados) and staged after so much color and texture, the return to America is a real bummer - and the script by Tom McCarthy (The Station Agent) has an unhurried, unprogrammatic feel to it.

The filmmakers have cast their underdogs well: Madhur Mittal plays the anxious, upright Dinesh; Suraj Sharma is the loose-limbed, pizza-loving Rinku; and they're both funny and endearing, two words that apply to the whole of the supporting cast. If only McCarthy and his director, Craig Gillespie (Lars and the Real Girl) had shifted the perspective exclusively to these young men. Instead, their arcs play out in service to another timeless trope: the redemption of a jerk. Hamm's perma-scowl is exhausting, and his bemused look at every encounter with Dinesh and Rinku's cultural

MOM'S NIGHT OUT

The faith-based Mom's Night Out celebrates the second Sunday in May like a 6-year-old who cobbles together a homemade Mother's Day card with crayons, construction paper, and some glue. The heart's in the right place, but aesthetically speaking, it's not terribly sophisticated. The movie aspires to be an inspirational screwball comedy of sorts about the stresses of motherhood, but the situational humor lacks the spontaneity necessary for some crazy fun. The fairly unimaginative script plays like a series of "Wouldn't it be hilarious if?" scenarios as imagined by the Family Channel, with a little bit of the Christian Broadcasting Network thrown in for godly measure.

Of the three moms all on the verge of a nervous breakdown, the frazzled Allyson (overplayed by a well-intended Drew) is unquestionably the farthest out on the ledge. Her kids lack discipline, her husband is always working, and her self-esteem diminishes with each self-critical assessment of her maternal capabilities. Along with her BFF Izzy (White) and the pastor's wife (Heaton), Allyson decides to take a temporary break from motherhood and kick up her high heels a little with an evening out on the town, starting with a fancy dinner and adult conversation at "Chez Magique." (The movie is full of silly names, like the pet canary named "Mama" that inexplicably travels in the backseat of a minivan.) Predictably enough, nothing goes as planned and bland hijinks inevitably ensue. As a way to bring it all together, a tattooed motorcyclist (played by a grounded Adkins) wisely sermonizes about God, faith, child-rearing, and an online streaming video of a female eagle caring for her young that apparently mesmerizes anyone who watches it. As already noted, it's not terribly sophisticated stuff, but it will probably work for many of those in its targeted demographic. Indeed, Mom's Night Out is a movie only a mother could love.

Peter Parker (Garfield), aka Spider-Man, still struggles with the conflict that arises between his responsibilities as a crime-fighter and being a good boyfriend to sweetheart Gwen Stacy (Stone) especially after the appearance of Peter's old pal Harry Osborn (DeHaan), aka Green Goblin, and putupon electrical engineer Max Dillon (Foxx), who soon transforms into the rage-fueled Electro. It's difficult to pinpoint exactly what's wrong with The Amazing Spider-Man 2. Lengthy sequences of vertiginous superhero smackdowns abound, but there are no plot turns or character developments to keep us glued to our seats. Joe Simon and Jack Kirby's 97-pound weakling-turned-supersoldier with the red-white-and-blue heart returns – alongside Marvel stalwarts Black Widow (Johansson), Jackson's Nick Fury, and newcomer Falcon (Mackie) - to thwart not only the free world's longtime nemesis Hydra, but also the internal strife amongst good guys at S.H.I.E.L.D. There is, to be sure, a heckuva lot of plot going on here in addition to a boundless supply of deep-core references and spot gags. And while it doesn't deliver quite as much giddy fun as 2011's origin story (fewer Nazis to smash), The Winter Soldier is a top-flight entry in Marvel's increasingly complex multimedia omniverse. At age 16, teenagers take a test to determine their faction aptitude; when Beatrice is tapped for three different factions - hence the title's "divergent" - her decision to join Dauntless necessitates a painful break from her Abnegation-rank parents (Judd and Goldwyn). It doesn't take long for the viewer to deflate: This is not a first-rate production. And that's okay. FADING GIGOLO

Soon, Murray hits upon a new money-making scheme: pimping out his young friend Fioravante. Meanwhile, a bout of head lice on the homefront sends Murray off with his gaggle of children to Williamsburg, Brooklyn, to visit cloistered Hasidic widow and expert delouser Avigal (Paradis), whom Murray decides is in need of Fioravante's services. The setup is great, but Fading Gigolo's follow-through lacks dynamism. It's a shame, because there are bits and pieces of a dandy film here that get choked out by a barrier of unproductive mulch. This new documentary aims for something very difficult: It takes a tired subject – the obesity epidemic - and completely reframes the conversation. Yes, the film cites a vast number of horrifying statistics, but the numbers aren't the point of Fed Up. The film doesn't preach to its viewers. Instead, it takes the novel approach of showing us how and why most everything we thought we knew about the subject is wrong. The problem, Fed Up argues, is that the food we consume - no matter the portion - is making us sick. The film cogently builds its case while showing us how everything we've learned about food and exercise over the past 30 years needs to be tossed out. With Fed Up, executive producers Katie Couric (who also narrates) and Laurie David aim to enrage us, and thereby goad the food industry to satisfy the appetites of newly informed consumers. TINDING VIVIAN MAIER

In 2007 at a Chicago auction house, John Maloof purchased a storage locker crammed full of photo prints and negatives. Struck by their quality, Maloof hunted down as much of the photographer's work as he could find. He was also intrigued by the mystery of the photographer, Vivian Maier (born in 1926), whose curious and unsentimental images of midcentury America he found so deeply striking. Using interviews with Maier's former employers, neighbors, and acquaintances, Maloof and co-director Charlie Siskel piece together the portrait of a woman who was profoundly private and, possibly, mentally unstable. There are no hard truths to be found in Finding Vivian Maier (really, how could there be?), but it's an engrossing doc nevertheless - a portrait of an American artist hiding in plain sight, a mystery with too few clues, and a sincere inquiry into how best to divine the wishes of the dead. Gustave (Fiennes). When moneyed octogenarian and hotel regular Madame D. (Swinton) suddenly turns up dead, the police suspect Gustave of foul play, a chase ensues, and Anderson's capering whodunit hardly stops for breath again. The

HEAVEN IS FOR REAL

The empirical question of heaven's existence is a rhetorical one by default. That is, unless you're reallife Colton Burpo (played by newcomer Corum), the 4-year-old son of a Midwestern pastor who matter-offactly claimed he visited the celestial kingdom while his body lay on an operating table with a ruptured appendix. Based on the bestselling 2010 Christian book. Heaven Is for Real is a well-meaning but misshapen movie about the folly of pursuing answers to unanswerable questions. For Todd Burpo (Kinnear), the query of fact or fantasy becomes his personal and professional obsession, one that could cost him his ministry, his reputation, and perhaps his family. Movies about the nature of faith usually defy cinematic translation, and, while its heart is in the right place, Heaven Is for Real is no exception. Frank Pavich manages to track down the 84-year-old Jodorowsky in Paris, befriends him, and proceeds to compile the heretofore untold story of the long dormant Dune. As a documentary on the

backstory of the unfilmed film, Jodorowsky's Dune is unsurpassable. More than that, it allows audiences a rare glimpse inside the furiously creative mind of Jodorowsky, who is still a wonderfully mad genius of the moving image. (05/09/2014)

THE LUNCHBOX

But due to the mistaken delivery of her lunchbox to dour, about-toretire Saajan (Khan), a correspondence between the two begins, via notes exchanged in the lunchbox. (An entire film could be made about the elaborate lunch-delivery system in Mumbai.) The Lunchbox is an engaging portrait of two lonely people, the kind of off-Bollywood movie we get to see so rarely in the States. Much is conveyed through subtle observations, without the need to stage a whole song-anddance around each discovery. 

Soon enough, a late-night noise complaint kicks off a war between the neighbors. Lavishly detailing each fresh sabotage and skimping on pretty much everything else, director Nicholas Stoller sorely miscalculates his film's strengths (Rogen and Byrne) and its weaknesses (frat boys). Amusing enough, but weirdly joyless, Neighbors brings little new to the table. Gross-out comedy has become an ever-elevating game of one-upmanship, wherein one film's turd joke becomes another's tidal swell of diarrhea. Is there a ceiling to this sort of entertainment? Noah (Crowe) lives in a barren Old Testament world in which Cain's wandering descendants viciously plunder the Earth and all its inhabitants. After experiencing visions of the watery engulfment of humanity, Noah treks - with his wife Naameh (Connelly), three sons (Lerman, Booth, and Carroll), and adopted daughter (Watson) - to seek the wisdom of his grandfather Methuselah (Hopkins), and comes to believe that he has been chosen to build an ark that will leave all human wickedness to drown. Despite Noah's visual marvels, the film takes itself a tad too seriously. In the end, the best enhancement to all the film's realism might be to purchase a ticket with D-Box seating. (04/04/2014)

ONLY LOVERS LEFT ALIVE

You can rest assured if you've been worrying that Jim Jarmusch – the arthouse auteur and reigning royal of independent cinema - has bowed to the demands of Hollywood trendiness with this vampire picture. Only Lovers Left Alive is less about matters of blood than what it takes for love to survive over millennia. Eve (Swinton) is living languorously in Tangier when she books a night flight to Detroit, to come to the side of her beloved Adam (Hiddleston). More bohemian outsiders than blood-sucking freaks, the pair luxuriate in each other's company, until Eve's sister Ava (Wasikowska) arrives and stirs up some trouble. The film is hypnotic, which lends it an addictive sensibility. Only Lovers Left Alive has no need to resort to hyperbole when a character exclaims: "Oh darling, that was centuries ago." Carly Whitten (Diaz) is a nononsense, Manhattan career woman who rudely discovers that her boyfriend Mark King (Coster-Waldau) is married when she pays him a surprise visit and is

met at the front door by his ditzy wife Kate (Mann). Histrionics and some physical comedy ensue, and are further deployed on a subsequent visit to Carly's apartment during which the two women become inebriated and bond. They follow Mark out to the Hamptons, where they see that the cur is cheating on both of them with a *third* woman, Amber (Upton), who eventually joins them in wreaking vengeance. THE QUIET ONES

Things just don't go bump in the night in The Ouiet Ones. They resound with the ear-shattering force of a sonic boom. But startling and scaring an audience are two different things. On that count, The Quiet Ones is a whimper of a horror film. Purportedly "inspired by true events" – seldom a good sign – the movie recounts an Oxford professor's unorthodox psychological experimentation (circa 1974) on an extremely damaged young woman named Jane Harper (Cooke), who Professor Coupland (Harris) believes to have the ability to manifest negative emotional energy in the guise of paranormal events, such as telekinetically slamming doors and summoning other frightening phenomena. There's no sense of trepidation in The Quiet Ones, because suspense requires a cogent storyline to either create or defy the viewer's expectations. Whether this lack of plausible narrative is the result of lazy filmmaking or shortcut editing is immaterial: Either way, you lose. (05/02/2014)

THE RAILWAY MAN

Early on in The Railway Man, Colin Firth's Eric Lomax, a British World War II veteran, shares a train compartment in 1980 with a lovely stranger named Patti (Kidman). He's also violently tormented by his time as a prisoner of war, forced to work on the construction of the Burma Railway (aka the Death Railway). Based on the real-life Lomax's memoir of the same name, The Railway Man runs on two tracks: the suspenseful dramatization of Eric's PTSD and burgeoning romance with Patti in 1980, and flashbacks to his brutalizing experiences in the war. The Railway Man is a different beast, of a different era - more committed to verisimilitude, less invested in seducing the viewer with its epic scope - but the tidy coda leaves the film feeling incomplete. THE RETRIEVAL

Ambitious as all get out, The Retrieval - set in 1864 somewhere near the Mason-Dixon line – is the sort of period drama that's usually considered to be off-limits to small-budget indie film productions. Yet writer/director/editor Chris Eska (August Evening) overcomes this obstacle to create a unique coming-of-age story. Thirteen-year-old Will (Sanders) is a Southern black kid, who, seemingly, has no relatives apart from his uncle Marcus (John). Together, during the waning months of the Civil War, the pair work for a white bounty hunter (Oberst), who captures and returns escaped slaves. On their newest mission of betrayal, Marcus and Will cross over to the North to lure back freedman Nate (Scott), who eventually adopts a protective attitude toward Will. A deceptively simple, emotionally rich tale. Eska's film does occasionally strain a bit too hard for significance. but that's hardly a problem for a film as distinctive as this one. (05/02/2014)

Jewel, meeting both her father (Garcia) and an old love (Mars), is delighted to be with them in the jungle, but Blu is a city bird, uncomfortable with the father-in-law and unhappy about the ex. Rio 2 is loaded with terrific vocal talents (though they are mostly squandered), and is agog with characters all feverishly working to carry way too much plot. Less a celebration of Brazil than of homogenized Las Vegas stage-show aesthetics. the film's more ethnic elements are Mixmasterblended into seamless Hollywood entertainment. ② 300: RISE OF AN EMPIRE

Less of a sequel than the second, meanwhileback-at-the-farm half of Zack Snyder's 2007 blockbuster 300, this righteously gory and spectacularly imagined film boasts even more bloodshed, battles, and rough sex than the original. Amazingly, it all coheres into a ripping good yarn, awash in spurting gobbets of testosterone and, this time out, a heaping helping of estrogen as well – thanks to Eva Green's fearless and cunning Artemisia, the leader of the Persian fleet. As the Greek General Themistokles (Stapleton) attempts to unite his country's various factions, Greece's "farmers, poets, sculptors" and everymen are pressed into service to valiantly, and perhaps hopelessly, repel the Persian warships. As with Snyder's original, Rise of an Empire has a mythic, dreamlike quality to it - fitting, given the subject matter. While very much a "hard R" movie, Rise of an Empire is, nevertheless, the perfect sort of spectacle for rainy weekend afternoons. (03/07/2014)

TRANSCENDENCE

The Singularity gives birth to a kind of Frankenstein's monster in this futuristic thriller from first-time director (and Oscar award-winning *Inception* cinematographer) Wally Pfister. After kicking off with a brief flash-forward that serves little purpose but to leech all the tension out of the next two hours, *Transcendence* jogs back five years to introduce married couple Will and Evelyn Caster (Depp and Hall), who have devoted their life's work to artificial-intelligence research, and their best friend (Bettany), a doctor who has reservations about

the wisdom of manufacturing sentient machines. When the Casters uncrack the code for uploading human consciousness, various factions – a neo-Luddite terrorist cell, an FBI unit, and another AI researcher (Freeman) – all tangle. *Transcendence* is not unambitious: It raises interesting questions about morality and technology, and about how easily, imperceptibly a line in the sand may shift. O UNDER THE SKIN

What makes the film such a mind-blower has everything to do with her chillingly unempathetic turn as, well, whatever she is. A cinematic happening near-guaranteed to get into your head for far longer than is comfortable. THE WIND RISES

Atypical of Miyazaki's more fantastical outings. The Wind Rises is a fictionalized account of a real person, Jiro Horikoshi, a young boy entranced by the idea of flight who grew up to be the inventor of the A6M Zero fighter plane. The film is crammed to bursting with arresting imagery, youthful idealism, and a sense of impending, elegiac loss of the Japan of Horikoshi's youth to the unvielding tides of soon-to-be bloodstained history. Miyazaki's swan song speaks to both the head and the heart, and it is, in myriad ways, some of the best work the legendary animator has ever created. (02/28/2014)





Eels

E from Eels said I could call him Mark. In his two-decade career, the driving force of the California fivepiece has wedged the letter between his personal

and professional lives. On his intimate 11th album released last month, *The Cautionary Tales of Mark Oliver Everett*, he's putting his given name and face front and center. Literally.

"I was trying to make a record that was just emotionally naked as possible," he explains. "I felt like the only honest way to present it was to have my name and photo on the album cover in a way that I wouldn't normally be comfortable with. I'm still not comfortable with it, actually.

"It's kind of an awful feeling, but it was the only way to do it."

Eels albums have never been demure. Everett has a knack for taking songs straight from the vein, and while he allows that releasing any album remains a vulnerable experience, this is "doubly so." Regardless, he offered himself as a martyr for the cause.

"I felt like it was a worthwhile endeavor because I do think it has something to offer the world. I don't mind taking a bullet now and then."

Despite his unease, Everett's looking forward to touring and putting the album behind him. With Austin in particular, he feels he has something to make up for. When Eels last swung through in 2011, customs woes kept their instruments abroad, leaving the band scrambling for gear. Ultimately, it led to a clipped Stubb's set.

"That was a little bit of a disaster," he recalls. "The good news is we're coming from Phoenix, so there's no chance of our equipment getting stuck in customs. There's a chance of us all being arrested on our way to Texas, so we're going to try to take a different route."
