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
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
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

PAINFUL REMINDERS


Dear Editor.

I'm heartbroken by the tragedy that has happened in Charleston. If you are also feeling the loss of these lives, then please join me in asking the University of Texas at Austin to remove all Confederate symbols and statues from the campus ["Written in Stone," News, May 29].

A statue may seem meaningless or harmless, but these icons of a racist ideology have long been used to intimidate and harass African-Americans all over the United States. The potency of these symbols which venerate slave owners and the genocidal violence that they committed is particularly deplorable to me, as an African-American alumna.

The Ku Klux Klan and other racist vigilante groups were founded by former Confederate soldiers. Currently, the Southern Poverty Law Center tracks contemporary hate groups who uphold the violent legacy of the Confederacy and hold fast to its symbols. The massacre of parishioners attending a prayer meeting at Mother Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church is a continuation of the violence that the Confederacy carried out in the mid-19th century, which was later taken up by the KKK and other white supremacist organizations.

Members of my family have lived in Texas since the 1870s, so these symbols are potent

reminders of the long and arduous fight for civil rights and the continued fight for equal protection under the law.

I understand that some members of the UT-Austin community support the preservation of Confederate statuary as historic monuments, important markers of what has passed. Yesterday, it became clear to me that the violence and dogma upheld by the Confederacy continue to live in the hearts of minds of misguided Americans. Therefore, these statues no longer

represent a historical past but a contemporary philosophy that intends to annihilate African-American people, even the elders in their house of prayer.

The University of Texas at Austin must take a stand based on the values that it currently upholds. It is an impossible contradiction that the university honors the Confederacy while seeking to create a safe, welcoming learning environment for all students.

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

Racism and Heroism

THOUGHTS ABOUT CHARLESTON AND THE AFTERMATH

I can't claim to add unique insight to the national outpouring of rage and sorrow in the wake of the June 17 massacre at Charleston's Emanuel A.M.E. Church.

but perhaps it's helpful for one local voice to be raised in memory and honor of the nine who died, their families, and their community. President Barack Obama, in his initial remarks following the murders, touched on most of the meanings reflected in this intentional assault on a historic black church, and how it fits into the long line of America's troubled racial history. The young man who attacked

this church and these parishioners had read of its history, and he hoped to use that history and his murders to ignite a "civil war" not a political war between states, but a genocidal war between the races.

In targeting this particular church, as Obama noted, he was taking his place in a long historical line.

Mother Emanuel is, in fact, more than a church. This is a place of

worship that was founded by African-Americans seeking liberty. This is a church that was burned to the ground because its worshippers worked to end slavery. When there were laws banning allblack church gatherings, they conducted services in secret. When there was a nonviolent movement to bring our country closer in line with our

highest ideals, some of our brightest leaders spoke and led marches from this church's steps. This is a sacred place in the history of Charleston and in the history of America.

Before the Civil War, Charleston was a major slave port, its population was majority slave, and its white rulers lived in fear (not entirely imaginary) of a slave revolt - imposing particularly brutal rule to prevent slave collaboration and potential insurrection. This latest assassin declared to his victims his racist fears, hatreds, and intentions - leaving one alive, he said, to carry the tale. He takes his place in a long line of white racial terrorists, trying to obliterate not only a people, but his own fantastical fears.

THE POWER OF SYMBOLS

In that light, the feckless attempts online or elsewhere trying to reinterpret the murderer's actions as due simply to mental illness (or even drugs) seem almost comical in their denial of the obvious. To deny that his attack was indeed "terrorism" - the use of violence to political and even genocidal ends - is an evasion of the plain facts as well as the tyrannical racist tradition -

AUSTIN FIRE CHIEF Rhoda Mae Kerr was elected president of the International Association of Fire Chiefs this week, making Kerr the first woman to serve as president of the 142-year-old, 11,000-plus member organization. In 2008, she became the first woman to take the lead at AFD.

FUN FUN FUN Fest and Austin's Parks and Recreation Department are arguing over whether the annual music festival can use the new threeacre off-leash dog area at Vic Mathias Shores. Council Member Greg Casar has said that if the two parties can't reach an agreement by Thursday, Council will intervene.

LOCAL CAMPAIGN SEASON for next spring's primaries begins to rumble into gear, with candidates for the state House, Travis County Sheriff, and Commissioners Court all jockeving for early visibility and funding. Check the Daily News online for coverage - and make sure your voter registration is up to date!

TRAVIS COUNTY REPUBLICANS have a primary to think about: Failed Council candidate Jay Wiley will challenge Rep. Paul Workman for his Southwest Austin seat. Workman already announced that he will defend his seat, rather than run to replace retiring Sen. Troy Fraser, R-Horseshoe Bay.

NATIONAL OUTCRY OVER still-venerated Confederate symbols in the wake of the Charleston massacre has reached **UT-Austin**. where students have petitioned President Gregory Fenves to address the Confederate statues on the South Mall, and specifically that of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy.

KEN PAXTON BETTER brush up on his legal skills: Special prosecutors assigned to investigate allegations of state securities fraud by the attorney general have announced they are taking their findings to a grand jury.

RICK PERRY HAD another "oops" moment when he called the Charleston shooting "an accident." The presidential hopeful had his campaign team issue a hasty correction that he really meant to say "incident." See "Perry's Top 10 Worst Hits," June 23.

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

slavery, Confederacy, KKK, White Citizens Council, Stormfront – that created him. That tradition is also why the Confederate battle flag has become the contested symbol: It was expressly adopted in this century by Southern racists determined to put an end to the Civil Rights Movement. The Nazi swastika is "historical" too – but it does not belong on statehouses, and neither does a permanent symbol of racial oppression.

Austin has its own symbolic controversy, in the Confederate statuary that disfigures UT-Austin's South Mall, installed explicitly to celebrate the antebellum South and the UT founders' determination – if they couldn't restore the Confederacy itself – to maintain Jim Crow and segregation. Should it all be thrown down? Not even possible, but certainly the current student effort to rid the mall of the spectre of Jefferson Davis has much to commend it.

I lean toward the educational sentiments of Prof. Edmund "Ted" Gordon ("Written in Stone," May 29), that whatever happens to the statues, even more important is "understanding what they mean and what they symbolize in the context of the construction of what we now have at the University of Texas." There is an unbroken line from veneration of the Confederacy and its founding principle – white supremacy – to the fanatical Charleston attack, and we need to know and understand those connections.

THE TRUE HERITAGE

There is one more aspect of the attack that bears witnessing, as the president also noted: "Once again, innocent people were killed in part because someone who wanted to inflict harm had no trouble getting their hands on a gun." The long heritage of white supremacy intertwines with the mostly modern U.S. cult of the gun - in this instance, apparently, some family members considered a thoughtful way of encouraging a troubled young family member was to provide him with a handgun. He used it to target a small group of worshippers who had no reason to believe that their Bible study should be armed and defended - the solution inevitably proposed by the usual gun-promoting interests.

That hadn't been necessary since, well, the Civil Rights Movement - when racists targeted houses of worship because they were a convenient place to attack large numbers of African-Americans. And then long before that - in the 1820s - when Charleston's white rulers forbade slave gatherings of any kind, and specifically banned slave churches as potential seats of literacy, conspiracy, and insurrection. The life and martyrdom of Charleston's own Denmark Vesey - the former slave who helped found Mother Emanuel and was executed for his part in a planned slave revolt - stands as a permanent, heroic example of the human spirit of liberation. Desperate acts of murder and terror cannot obliterate that spirit.

Be a Good Citizen STATISTICALLY SPEAKING, YOU'RE PROBABLY A LOUSY RECYCLER, AND YOUR WORKPLACE WASTES ENERGY. SHAPE UP.

I spend a good amount of this column reporting on what officials can do to improve local government. This week, it's all about local governments telling us what we can do to be better citizens.

First up, Travis County Commissioners **Brigid Shea** and **Gerald Dougherty** hosted a luncheon Wednesday to brief local businesses on the county's new **Property Assessed Clean Energy** (PACE) program – a creative financial tool that enables commercial property owners to upgrade older, inefficient buildings with no up-front costs. You know, if Shea and Dougherty are on the same side of an environmental issue, it's got to be a no-brainer, and this one sounds like it is.

In 2013, the Texas legislature enacted SB **385**. authorizing cities and counties to work with private-sector lenders and property owners to finance energy- or water-saving improvements on commercial properties. Because the term of a PACE loan may extend up to 20 years, utility cost savings can exceed the loan payments, meaning the improvements can generate positive cash flow, with no upfront cost to the property owner. Shea calls it "one of those rare win-win situations where county government can enable businesses to do the right thing, at no cost to taxpayers. This program has the potential to save hundreds of millions of gallons of water each year, and similarly reduce energy use."

Shea and Dougherty co-sponsored the resolution in January that made Travis the first county in Texas to participate in the PACE program, and now they're ready to get some money flowing. For more info, or to see if you or your building have a project that would qualify, see www.keepingpaceintexas.org or www.texaspaceauthority.org. Also this week, **Austin Resource Recov**ery released the results of an independent study, auditing the materials ARR picks up through its residential curbside trash and recycling pickup programs. Austin's first-ever **Waste Characterization Study** determined that some 44% of residential trash going to the landfill could have been recycled, and another 46% could have been composted – meaning only 10% of it is actual trash that

ought to be going to the landfill in a perfect world. Those 58,000 tons of recyclable materials that go in the landfill each year have a market value of some **\$4.7 million**; no value is put on the 61,000 tons of compostable material that go in the landfill (and create methane gas), but the city already does a brisk business in Dillo Dirt, and could certainly use more.

At 47 pages, the full report makes for interesting reading: depressing that we're doing so badly, but encouraging that we could do so much better. Read it, or the bullet-point handout version, at www.austintexas.gov/ news/what's-our-trash.

Speaking of monuments (see Point Austin, p.10, and "The End of the Confederacy at UT?" p.16), the City's **George Washington Carver Museum, Cultural and Genealogy Center** (1165 Angelina) will celebrate the 150th anniversary of Juneteenth by unveiling its newest addition, the **Juneteenth Memorial Monument**, on Saturday, June 27, with a dedication ceremony beginning at 11am, and games, food, vendors, crafts, and more activities until 4pm. It's free, and "the public is invited and encouraged to come, listen, and learn the rich history we have to share." The sculptures were originally commissioned by the Texas Legislature in 1999 to serve as a memorial on the Capitol grounds. But that project stalled, and the sculptures went into storage at a state outdoor warehouse, until Reps. **Sylvester Turner** and **Dawnna Dukes** led a request for their donation to the Carver Museum. The five sculptures represent the timeline of the news of the Emancipation Proclamation being passed from the lawmaker to the preacher, to the slaves, who deliver the news to their daughter, who waits to tell her story to future generations, who can climb onto a sixth pedestal, to symbolically receive the message, which, sadly, never gets old.

Flood Aid TX, a benefit concert supporting Central Texas disaster relief efforts is this Sunday; tickets are available via the effort's website, www.floodaidtx. org. All proceeds go to the United Way of Hays County

Flood Relief Fund and the Austin Disaster Relief Network. It is being hosted by Asleep at the Wheel's Ray Benson, the city of Austin, Travis County, the LCRA, and the Texas Music Office. The lineup is ridiculous: Jack Ingram, Ray Benson, Gary P. Nunn, Bill Carter, the Texas Tornadoes, Little Joe y La Familia, Mingo Fishtrap, Shinyribs, and oh-so-many, many, more, playing on four stages, all day long, with food from several local food

trucks. Noon-10pm on Sunday, June 28, at Palmer Events Center. \$35-150. www.floodaidtx.org.

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No More Pencils, No More Books ...

COUNCIL APPROACHES ITS SUMMER BREAK

By the time you read this, presumably **City Council** will have informally adjourned for summer break: Work can proceed (especially at the staff level, intensively for Financial Services), but Council does not resume its formal meeting schedule until July 30, when FY 2016 budget work sessions begin in earnest, and occupy most of August into early September. (I write "presumably" because this Council has been kicking a lot of cans down the weekly agendas, and today's "final" meeting – June 25, the day after the *Chronicle* goes to press – may turn out not to be quite final after all.)

In the past, most Council members have made themselves somewhat scarce for a couple of weeks; a few left town pronto and officially stayed more or less incommunicado. Whether the 10-1 Council, which generally likes to distinguish its new-andimproved procedures from all and sundry that have gone before, will follow suit, remains to be confirmed.

There will be a presumably brief agenda today, as Council first meets in the morning as the **Austin Energy committee** of the whole, and then turns to its regular order of business for action votes – e.g., perhaps recommending to itself in the morning, acting in the following session. (If you're already confused, blame the last Council's decision not to move AE toward an appointed board, as threatening the delicate balance between democratic representation and managing effectively a major utility business.)

Last Thursday's meeting (June 18) reflected widening cracks on the dais – some procedural, some substantive – and they didn't disappear by Tuesday (June 23), the first of two "special-called" sessions to address matters that have been accumulating for some time. The June 18 agenda originally listed 110 Items – by far the lengthiest of this year's meetings – for two major reasons: The dais had gotten in the habit of postponing its most difficult decisions (complex or just politically awkward), and then the summer deadline loomed, and city business needs to proceed whether Council is in session or not. Mayor Pro Tem **Kathie Tovo** (the only holdover/experienced member), made a point of noting that had earlier agendas not been so short, perhaps this one wouldn't be so long. "This is a big city with a big budget," she reminded her colleagues. "We still have to conduct the business of the city."

So, faced with the likelihood that conducting all that business was not going to be accomplished in a day, Council scheduled an additional meeting Tuesday and then added some unrelated matters to today's AE agenda. And when Tuesday's morning session opened, a mild internal coup took place. Several CMs had already begun push-

ing back against the pattern of some members – generally one of the three westsiders, D6's **Don Zimmerman**, D8's **Ellen Troxclair**, and D10's **Sheri Gallo**, but to a lesser extent D1's **Ora Houston** as well – to pull for discussion many contracting or purchasing items, and then to interrogate staff on matters of

cost, utility, history, and so on, generally with the implication that the costs have been excessive or arbitrary and staff negligent in managing the city's business. (Gallo and Troxclair are usually polite and professional; Zimmerman is reflexively condescending, occasionally abrasive.)

D2 CM **Delia Garza** had earlier weighed in against micromanagement (most specifically in the staff "vacancy" discussion that proceeded for weeks and eventually came to virtually nothing), and D7's **Leslie Pool** has also increasingly objected to the contract nitpicking, on substantive grounds and also because it was gobbling increasing amounts of Council time. By Tuesday, she effectively collaborated across the dais (literally the Boards and Commissions Room tables) with D4's **Greg Casar**, who informed his colleagues that on contract, purchasing, and real estate matters he intended to call the question after an initial explanation by whatever CM had pulled the Item – and with seconds from Pool, there were a series of 6-3 or 7-3 votes (new mother Garza was absent) that essentially informed the three persistent dissenters: You can try to stick a wrench in the works, but we're going to get the production line moving again.

A few of these obstructions have been triggered simply by expensive contracts – one bone of contention was the Downtown "wayfinding" project that Troxclair objected to because of cumulative cost and because "most of us have smartphones and can find our own way" (although the innovative system is in fact designed to work directly with



smartphones). The silliest was a diversion over a hav-and-pecan revenue-producing contract with a farmer on Austin Water's Hornsby Bend property, used, among other things, to manufacture Dillo Dirt; Troxclair and Zimmerman wanted to shorten the option years despite AW staff patiently explaining that it takes time for land and crops to be improved and developed, and farmers are less likely to commit to projects that ignore agricultural timelines. (Similar nitpicking proceeded over Fleet Services bulk deals with manufacturers for new cars; Zimmerman insisted that used cars are always cheaper - despite staff's dogged insistence that you can't direct-buy used cars in bulk at a manufacturer's discount.)

At any rate, goosed by the prevailing motions to call the question and Council's sudden eagerness to get things done, the Tuesday session did manage a few accomplishments. In several highlights, Council: • Despite some misgivings about effectiveness, approved a new **Austin Energy** "deferred payment" system for customers who fall way behind on bills;

Approved the wayfinding system, with the proviso that staff regularly report total funding in addition to annual installments;
Approved the hay-and-pecan contract, shortening the option years, with staff agreement;

Authorized negotiation and execution of a laptop/tablet-lending contract for libraries (after Zimmerman objected – in error – that the system didn't accommodate Windows OS);
 Approved the eventual purchase of \$8.2 million worth of new vehicles;

• Discussed, but did not approve, the **new Austin Water drainage charge structure**, likely to increase the burden on homeowners but lessen it on multifamily renters (who use less impervious cover).

That leaves plenty to be done today:

• A construction contract for "chilled water" piping that will eventually amount to \$12 million over five years (CMs hope to have questions answered by today);

• A \$300,000 consultant contract for an independent review of AE's **Resource**, **Generation**, and

Climate Protection Plan (Zimmerman wanted to make an issue of the allegedly unconsidered cost of Climate Protection – which he disdains – but his colleagues refused to concede);

• Extending an existing contract with nonprofit **West Austin Youth Association** for Lamar Beach parkland (CM Houston has attempted to link WAYA with the proposed – and traction-less – Decker Lake golf course in her district, without success);

• A deal currently being worked out to allow **Fun Fun Fun Fest** to return to Auditorium Shores (we shall see);

• And a discussion, but no action planned, on Council's boards and commissions appointment process, notoriously languishing as volunteer terms expire.

And if they manage all that today ... school's out for the summer.

TCAD CHALLENGE SUSPENDED

As expected Monday morning, the **Appraisal Review Board** for the **Travis Central Appraisal District** effectively accepted the "agreed order" between the city of Austin and TCAD – suspending, for the moment, the city's challenge of TCAD's **commercial property valuations**. The suspension was essentially a tactical maneuver by Mayor **Steve Adler** and the city's attorneys, allowing the TCAD certification of the current year's tax rolls to proceed by the statutory end of August – but then allowing the city to appeal the ARB decision to state district court, and meanwhile share its discovery information of commercial market prices with TCAD's appraisers.

Although the ARB's decision effectively accepted the mutual decision of the city and TCAD, it took the form of a vote by the 25 sitting ARB members to "deny" the city's challenge for lack of evidence. Following brief presentations by the attorneys and others (Mayor Pro Tem **Kathie Tovo** among them), the somewhat perplexed ARB members briefly discussed the unexpected situation – one arguing that the proper action would be to "dismiss" the challenge, not deny it – and then voted to deny, 22-3. ARB attorney **Peter Low** said there had been no official notice to the board's members of the city's otherwise well-publicized strategy. "We didn't want to influence them in advance of the hearing," Low said, "and we had prepared for a three-day hearing."

The city now has 60 days to appeal, presumably sufficient to allow TCAD to certify its 2015 values and county taxing jurisdictions to prepare their FY 2016 budgets. That was the plan announced by the mayor at the June 18 City Council meeting; and Tovo told the *Chronicle* that the hope is that an eventual adjustment of commercial valuations will allow less of a burden on residential homeowners (including a potential revision of this year's values).

The denial is something of a victory for TCAD, although both parties say they're continuing to collaborate in the review. TCAD Chief Appraiser **Marya Crigler** said that TCAD has not yet seen the city's underlying valuation data, and she released a prepared statement continuing to question the consultants' report the city relied on in making its challenge. Her statement stoutly defended TCAD's appraisal practices, noting that they adhere to professional and legal standards and are also subject to a "rigorous" review by the state as well as independent appraisers. Moreover, Crigler's release continued, "the study commissioned by the City of Austin has multiple substantive factual and mathematical errors and utilizes a flawed methodology that misrepresents the level of appraisal in Travis County." — *Michael King*



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After the Flood

Stepping across the sodden linoleum floor of a house that no longer exists, I surveyed the rushing Blanco River and the fallen cypress trees littering its banks. Sheared to the bark, they were still bent, this past Saturday, June 20, in the direction of the flood waters that devastated Wimberley, San Marcos, and other parts of Hays County on Memorial Day weekend.

Like so many across Texas, staff at the *Chronicle* were touched by the storms: My family's home in San Marcos was flooded with over six feet of water, and marketing manager **Dallen Terrell**'s grandparents, **Gay and Michael Sullivan**, received a direct smack from the Blanco.

Homes along the Sullivans' street were tagged with red or yellow signs, designating whether owners will be allowed to restore the structures. If yellow, like the Sullivans, work can begin; if red, the entire house is unsafe and must be demolished. Some, like the neighbors whose foundation I was standing on, didn't have to wait for a designation – their entire house was just washed away. Terrell's aunt, **Gail Schaubhut Fisher**, explained the fallen trees will mostly stay as they are – bent and shucked – in order for them to sprout saplings that will endure far longer than all of us. It's hard to remember, with precious items soaking in the mud, that this is all a part of nature's renewal.

Seventy homes in Wimberley were completely washed away, and about 300 were damaged. Six days after the floods, President Obama declared a natural disaster in three counties. FEMA descended to offer tangible aid to people who had previously been paralyzed by the extent of the damage. In San Marcos, two mobile stations, at the San Marcos Activity Center and the Blanco Gardens Neighborhood, set up to connect home- and business-owners with available aid. Even homeowners with flood insurance can apply, and depending on per-



sonal circumstances, can qualify for grants, up to \$200,000 in disaster loans, and temporary housing. Undocumented immigrants with a U.S.-born child can also secure "short-term, non-cash" help.

But in the weeks since, even families that have been able to secure aid or volunteers have been hampered by persistent rains, both in terms of work days lost and construction setbacks. In the early evening Saturday, the rain began again, and work came to a stop at the Sullivans'. Terrell's grandfather covered his 1967 Alfa Romeo with a tarp. – *Nina Hernandez*

The End of the Confederacy at UT?

As the national outcry over **South Carolina**'s Confederate flag has grown since last week's **horrific massacre** of nine black Charleston churchgoers by a white supremacist, **UT-Austin's Confederate monuments** (see "Written in Stone," May 29) have attracted renewed scrutiny as well.

A petition to UT President **Greg Ferves** to remove the **Jefferson Davis** statue has over 2,400 signatures, following up on a student government resolution, passed in March, in support of the removal. And in a June 23 press release, Ferves announced "a committee of students, faculty members, and alumni that will discuss the future of the Jefferson Davis statue and provide a range of options for me to review."

After a campaign conducted largely on social media (#nodavisoncampus), Fenves had tweeted in response on June 20, "I take this issue very seriously and am working with students and campus leadership on it." On June 22, he met with student government, and SG President **Xavier Rotnofsky** told the *Chronicle* that he feels optimistic. The efforts to remove the statue have been supported by **Paul Begala**, state Rep. **Eddie Rodriguez**, D-Austin, and U.S. Rep. **Joaquin Castro** of San Antonio. That night, three of the Confederate statues on campus were spray-painted with "Black Lives Matter" and "Bump All the Chumps" (referring to one of the slogans calling to remove the Davis statue). The student government denounced the vandalism, urging students and supporters to work through the administration and student government.

Gregory Vincent, vice president for Diversity and Community Engagement at the university, will chair the new committee. On June 23, Vincent took questions in front of the Jefferson Davis statue. He said the task force hopes to make their decision by the end of the summer, while noting that any change would have to be approved by the regents. He also denounced the vandalism.

While the task force announcement was a sign of progress for many, it's worth noting that Fenves isn't the first to organize such a committee. As we reported in May, former UT presidents **Bill Powers** and **Larry Faulkner** both put together task forces to look into the statues – but neither ever did anything about them. Indeed, students have protested the statues since at least the late Sixties; it should be interesting to see how Fenves handles the situation this time around, given the national attention. – *Mac McCann*



CHEER UPS CHEERLESS OVER DEVELOPMENT

On Monday morning, **Cheer Up Charlie's** owner **Tamara Hoover** watched as a landscaper dug up plants on her bar's back patio and loaded them into a van. It's the beginning of a construction project that the Red River club is begrudgingly hosting – their landlord agreed to accommodate the development of a Hyatt hotel parking structure that will butt up against the property's western border.

The major concern, for Cheer Ups and Austin music fans, is that the construction will impact – or potentially eviscerate – the natural limestone wall that backdrops the venue's outside stage. That's the worst-case scenario, not a foregone conclusion.

An email from contractors **Journeyman Construction** to property

managers **DT Land Group** details plans for scaffolding and fencing to be erected before beginning a rock removal process on the bluff that includes "Chipping/hammering/chiseling loose and/or fractured rock from the exposed hillside facing CUC" and clearing a cedar tree. In effect, they're eliminating parts of the rock that could fall later when crews begin digging the parking structure.

"There's no communication of guideline or scope of how

much rock will be removed, so that's my concern," said Hoover. "I haven't been given any assurance whether it's a few rocks or half the wall." Hoover is incensed to have the carefully cultivated aesthetic of her patio disrupted. She's been told that a chain-link fence and plywood board will remain on the property for 18 months. "The property manager suggested it would be fun to invite customers to spray paint the construction wall, because we're so creative," she sighed. "Apparently they think we're little kids."

In January, property managers told Hoover that the Hyatt wanted to remove the rock wall altogether. She expressed disapproval and heard that her landlord, **Tracy Rawl**, also refused. On June 11, a DT agent informed her that, for safety purposes, pieces of the rock bluff and its natural brush were scheduled to be removed. Hoover believes that Rawl eventually signed off for a monetary agreement.



The *Chronicle* visited DT's offices on Monday to inquire about the deal between the Hyatt and Rawl and whether construction plans accounted for preservation of the limestone amphitheatre. DT's Chief Operating Officer **Belva Green** refused to comment. Hyatt representatives didn't respond to messages about the matter.

Cheer Ups may receive a rent reimbursement of \$5,000 for each month that construction equipment is on their property. But Hoover expects losses to exceed that sum. "This is going to affect our bottom line big time," she said. "People don't want to come to your space when it's under construction." City Council Member **Kathie Toyo** says

> she's received emails and calls from citizens concerned about Cheer Ups. Her staff's research echoes Hoover's worry that the scope of construction isn't clear. Tovo's also looking into whether contractors have obtained the proper permits and is making sure all applicable laws are followed. "What we're trying to do now is facilitate a meeting between all of the parties so that everyone can be in the same room and share information," Tovo said Monday. "Then we'll see if we can resolve all the issues."

That meeting is scheduled for Friday, June 26. Until then, Cheer Ups supporters plan to protest on the property to ward off construction crews who are expected to erect scaffolding on the patio. On Wednesday, June 24, beginning at 5:50am, at least a dozen protesters occupied the Cheer Ups parking lot and successfully turned away contractors, who left at 7am, according to organizer **Marcus Lawyer**.


For Tovo, Cheer Ups' situation represents the larger matter of new development endangering established local culture. "It's certainly a concern for Downtown, and perhaps nowhere more than the Red River Cultural District: the continued need to strike a balance between the new developments occurring, and preserving our iconic places and the special character of Austin. I want to make sure, as the city grows and changes, that the businesses that have made Austin such a great city have the ability not just to stay, but to thrive." – Kevin Curtin

Cop Killer Ready to Die

Convicted cop-killer **Brandon Daniel** is attempting to expedite his execution. The 27-year-old Austinite, sentenced to death for the 2012 killing of **Austin Police Department** Officer **Jaime Padron**, stood before Travis County District Judge **Brenda Kennedy** Friday and asked the court to allow him to waive all future automatic appeals and simply move straight forward with his sentence. Daniel told the judge that he wanted to minimize additional anguish for his and Padron's families, and that he wanted to limit his time in prison.

Kennedy said that she could not grant Daniel his request – the Court of Criminal Appeals had previously denied his petition to waive future appeals – but that she will decide within the next week whether she'll allow him to represent himself in future appeal proceedings, an action that would expedite the process. She scheduled Daniel a meeting with a psychologist to determine his mental competence, and reset his hearing for July 2. Padron, a Marine veteran who spent 14 years with the San Angelo PD before arriving in Austin in 2008, was

the first APD officer shot and killed in the line of duty since 1978. He was murdered while trying to prevent Daniel from shoplifting at a North Austin Walmart on April 6, 2012. – Chase Hoffberger



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Kill Bill(s) GOVERNOR VETOES MORE THAN 40 BILLS

Anyone expecting Gov. **Greg Abbott** to withhold his veto pen in his first legislative session better not have slept in late on Saturday. By the end of a last-minute killing spree, Abbott had put a red line through a total of 42 bills and resolutions passed by lawmakers last session. On top of that, with the veto deadline expiring at midnight on June 20, he pulled an extra \$295 million out of the state budget through line item vetoes.

Every session, it seems like one lawmaker gets hit harder than anyone else. This year's punching bag was Rep. **Ryan Guillen**, D-Rio Grande City, who was author or coauthor of seven vetoed measures. That included **House Bill 225**, sponsored by Sen.

Kirk Watson, D-Austin. Nicknamed the **911 Lifeline bill**, it was patterned after Watson's 2011 SB 1331, giving legal protection to someone helping a drunk teen. Watson said, "If they call and they stay there, they don't get hit with an alcohol with minors charge." HB 225 extended that protection to drugs, but Abbott killed it. In his veto statement, he laud-

ed its "admirable goal," but said lawmakers had rejected recommendations from his office to limit the protection to minors and first-time offenders.

A more direct loss for Watson was **SB 496**, which would have improved funding for flextime students. The good news is that companion measure **HB 2660** survived the veto pen, so systems like AISD's Twilight Evening School Program will be more financially secure. However, SB 496 provided more leeway for teaching pregnant kids or young parents. Watson said, "It would have focused on keeping kids in school, particularly kids that have a child, and don't want to drop out. When you say you want to keep kids in schools, when you say you're pro-life, well, this is a pro-life bill."


While his name was on SB 496, Watson gave all credit to Rep. **Donna Howard**, D-Austin, as the real brains behind the proposal. She issued her own terse reaction to Abbott's actions, writing, "Without a doubt, the clearest victims of this veto are the at-

risk students – including some teen parents – who will drop out of school due to a lack of effective services and support."

Watson's days as mayor of Austin dealing with congestion may have made the death of a third measure a particularly hard pill to swallow. **SB 1032** would have gotten some state employees off the road by allowing tele-

commuting. He said, "Those in control of the Capitol say over and over again that they want to run government like business. Well, businesses are allowing telecommuting more and more."

Abbott had already signed a few vetoes before last week's massacre; most notable was **SB 359** by Sen. **Royce West**, D-Dallas.



Currently, Texas physicians must involve cops and courts if they want to hold a patient who, for reasons of mental illness, they believe is a risk to themselves or others. That's not always easy, especially in remote areas, and West's bill would have given doctors limited hold powers. However, the Texas Home School Coalition has a blanket opposition to any bill it decides "undermines parental rights" and prodded their members into a phone campaign against the bill. Seemingly, Abbott sided with their position that, not only are Texas homeschoolers now more qualified than teachers, they also now know more about mental health diagnoses than trained medical staff. Citing the Fourth, Fifth, and Fourteenth Amendments, Abbott wrote in his veto statement that giving doctors power of detention normally reserved for peace officers "would lay the groundwork for further erosion of constitutional liberties."

Watson praised Abbott for handling vetoes more diplomatically than his predecessor Rick Perry. In his first session at the mansion back in 2001, former state rep. Perry dropped the hammer on 83 bills in all. Yet he calmed down in later years, killing only 25 measures in 2011 and 28 in 2013. While Watson opposed Abbott nixing so many bills that had been vetted by lawmakers this year, he appreciated the courtesy of a morning phone call from the governor's office telling him the cull was coming. Under Perry, that first call usually came from the media. Watson said, "Perry used vetoes as a weapon. Abbott, even when I disagree with him and am disappointed, the truth is that it doesn't have the same feel." - Richard Whittaker

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Courthouse Campaign Takes Shape

"I stepped around six children as I walked down the stairs," said Judge **Lora Livingston** on Monday, explaining one of the vivid reasons for the campaign in progress to replace Travis County's **Heman Sweatt Civil Courthouse** with a new "Civil and Family Courts Complex" to be built at Fourth and Guadalupe. "There is simply no place for children to wait while their parents are in court."

That was much of the day's theme at Monday's press conference, held at the Women's Community Center of Central Texas Downtown. County officials and advocates for the new courthouse complex (for which a \$291.6 million bond vote will appear on the November ballot) emphasized specifically the need for better and safer accommodations for children and families than the 84-year-old courthouse can provide. Heman Sweatt, at 10th and Guadalupe, housed three courtrooms when it was built in 1931, for a county of 78,000 people. Now, for a county population of 1.2 million, it contains 19 chockablock courtrooms and offices containing more than 300 employees - and is plagued by inadequate technology and access, leaks, fire hazards, vermin, etc. The close quarters also mean that people involved in domestic disputes - including those who have been abused by family members - must regularly encounter one another in the overcrowded hallways and elevators, often waiting together outside courtrooms.

In addition to Judge Livingston, speakers Monday included **Martha Dickie** (chair of the courthouse focus committee); **Julia Spann** (executive director of SafePlace); County Judge **Sarah Eckhardt** (who

described the basic construction plan, noting that the proposal includes a second office tower and underground garage, income from which will help offset the bond expense); Nancy Gray (director of communications for the Austin Bar Association): state District Judge John **Dietz** (who emphasized the overwhelming usage of the current courthouse); County Judge Eric Shepperd (who noted the judicial outreach and educational programs currently unavailable for lack of space), and Genevieve Van Cleve, leading the Bar campaign to support the bond, who argued that "Travis County values" require "access to services, access to justice."

Although virtually anyone who enters the current courthouse - some 200,000 people party to 50,000 cases annually, said Judge Dietz - quickly recognizes the decrepit state of the building, the speakers acknowledged that they will need to educate voters on the hefty price tag to build an adequate and safe courthouse. (The cost, advocates emphasized, amounts to about \$42 a year on a \$325,000 home - "or a \$3.50 taco a month.") "This is not a discretionary function or expenditure," argued Dickie. "The courthouse is constitutionally mandated, and it is not a luxury." She said several committees of judges and officials and volunteers over the last decade had thoroughly reviewed and revised the needs and the costs, and the proposed bond reflects accurately what is needed to construct a modern courthouse facility for Travis County. "We need this funding," said Dickie, "and we have to have this courthouse."

Corporate-Media Symbiosis

But wait ... shouldn't journalists ask: Who's providing this education?

Corporations, that's who. NPF is funded by such giants as **Bayer**, **Entergy**, **Ford**, **Honda**, **Lockheed Martin**, and

Prudential, as well as by corporate foundations, lobbyists, and PR firms. And who is the chief sponsor of NPF's boot camp on the future of food? **Monsanto**! In fact, NPF moved the conference to St. Louis, home of this notorious huckster of genetically altered frankenfoods, specifically so reporters could come visit its corporate labs and get "educated."

When asked about Monsanto's bad reputation, NPF chief Sandy Johnson turned oddly defensive: "In whose eyes? In your eyes?" she snapped at the reporter, before asserting that Monsanto's GMO manipulations "allowed the United States to feed the world." Hmmm ... that's a line straight out of Monsanto's propaganda, not exactly the stuff of real journalism.

Indeed, what's going on in the St. Louis boot camp is symbiosis in action: 1) the corporation funds the corporate foundation, which 2) puts a veneer of journalistic legitimacy on a conference that 3) promotes what the corporation is selling.

If much of today's reporting seems unreal, that's because it's not real and not journalism – it's spoon-fed corporate indoctrination.

County Medical Director Resigns

HINCHEY SAYS HE'LL BE MOVING TO THE PRIVATE SECTOR

Dr. **Paul Hinchey** announced his resignation from the position of Travis County Medical Director Friday, June 19. The news, delivered to the mayor and members of the **City Council** via memo from City Manager **Marc Ott**, ends a six-year stint during which Hinchey's medical license oversaw clinical care for the entirety of the county's EMS systems – most notably, **Austin-Travis County EMS**. His last day will be Sept. 2.

According to the memo, Hinchey is leaving his position to pursue "an incredible career in the private sector" as the president of East Coast operations for **Evolution Health**, a medical practice that specializes in treating high-risk patients through athome intervention and care. Dr. **Jose Cabanas** will take over as Acting Medical Director; Ott said he'll confer with his executive team in the coming week "to develop our strategy for filling the position permanently."

Hinchey, who came to Travis County in 2009 after serving as medical director in Wake County, N.C., has been instrumental in installing a series of initiatives that have significantly increased the general public's ability to administrate bystander CPR. Ott notes that more than 25,000 Travis County residents are now trained in the practice of "Take 10" compression-only CPR thanks to Hinchey's efforts. The medical director has also helped ATCEMS maintain legitimately impressive success rates on critical failures despite a rapidly growing population.

Hinchey also faced widespread criticism for many of the decisions he made in office. Specifically, in 2012, he implemented a change to ATCEMS's staffing model that resulted in ambulances being staffed not with two paramedics but rather one paramedic and one emergency medical technician. Though many emergency medical services employ the model, ATCEMS had grown to be an industry leader on the practice of the two-paramedic trucks, and the decision riled many medics, who believed that Hinchey was sacrificing patient care to fix a chronic staffing problem.

Indeed, as the Chronicle's May 8 cover story, "High Stress at EMS," made clear, the tensions between Hinchey and Austin-Travis County's paramedics extended well beyond that staffing. Hinchey, who as medical director wielded the utmost power on personnel decisions (he could revoke a medic's credentials to practice if he believed they violated any of the prescribed standards, with no oversight), regularly butted heads with the **Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical** Services Employee Association and their president, Tony Marquardt, and was often considered to have very little empathy for the stressful lives of medics. In fact, suspicions from the ATCEMSEA that Hinchey was abusing his power to de-accredit medics had grown so strong over the last three years that Marquardt took to the state Capitol, working with Rep. Celia Israel, D-Austin, to draft HB 3488, which would afford de-accredited medics a chance to make an appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings. (Hinchey opposed the bill, telling the *Chronicle* that it would take the decision out of the medical director's hands and give SOAH the chance to "render an opinion that could potentially force me to put back into practice someone I think is a danger to the public.") On April 22, he introduced a consolation process: a peer-review system that would allow an appointed panel

of medics to anonymously peruse the facts of each credentialing review. But the ATCEMSEA scoffed at the gesture, considering it to be a flawed fix for a glaring issue. The fractured relationship had shown no signs of mending.

On Friday, after receiving word of Hinchey's resignation, Marquardt told the *Chronicle:* "I'm happy with the outcome, whatever brought it on. ... While I am optimistic about the future of medical direction, our goals of professionalism, fairness of process, and oversight have not changed. I look forward to working with the City Manager, City Council, and all subsequent medical directors."

Hinchey's resignation seemed to serve as an unofficial impetus for a conversation held Monday, June 22, at a Public Safety Committee hearing about the potential merger of ATCEMS with the Austin Fire Department, a consolidation that's been intermittently proposed since ATCEMS's inception in the Seventies. Noting that "this is mostly just a discussion to see if we even want to look into it," PSC Chairman Don Zimmerman brought Marquardt, Assistant City Manager Rey Arellano, Austin Firefighters Association President Bob Nicks, and Public Safety Commission Vice Chair Mike Levy before the dais to share their thoughts on the potential merger.

Arellano was brief, but Nicks, Marquardt, and Levy all agreed that the most important consideration to take into talks of any consolidation would be that of the workers involved: the firefighters and the medics. "They're really providing the great service," said Nicks. "The number one thing is we've got to do this thing thoughtfully. We can't be forced – and I don't think the main thing needs to be to save money. I think that will be a likely product. The main thing needs to be how we take two really well-functioning organizations and make them even better."

Much of the discussion centered around the greater opportunity for change at ATCEMS now that Hinchey's headed to the private sector. PSC member **Leslie Pool** noted that she wanted to re-evaluate the role of the medical director and how it operates with medics. She added that she'd support reverting to the two-paramedic staffing model, rather than the two-tiered system employed by Hinchey. – *Chase Hoffberger*



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Earlier this month, the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals dealt a devastating blow to already beleaguered Texas abortion providers. In a heavily anticipated ruling on Whole Women's Health v. Cole, the conservative New Orleans-based court upheld the final provision of Texas' multi-part 2013 abortion law, House Bill 2, forcing clinics to comply with the same costly building guidelines as ambulatory surgical centers - a standard deemed wholly unnecessary and even dangerous by reproductive rights advocates and many medical experts, including the American Medical Association.

A death knell for most Texas abortion providers, HB 2's final provisions are set to take effect July 1, shuttering all but eight clinics in a state home to 27 million people, including more than 5 million reproductive-age women. In the meantime, plaintiffs have asked the U.S. Supreme Court to step in. As stringent abortion regulations sweep the nation, state by state, and circuit courts create a patchwork of contradictory opinions, legal scholars predict the especially draconian Texas case could very well reach America's high court, forcing it to tackle abortion regulation and provide much needed clarity on what constitutes an "undue burden" for women seeking access.

WE DO NOT BALANCE THE WISDOM ...

According to the Supreme Court, it is considered unconstitutional for a law to place an "undue burden" on a person's ability to exercise her "fundamental rights." But since neither "undue burden" nor "fundamental right" is a precise term, application of the rule has varied. In the seminal abortion case Planned Parenthood v. Casey, the Supreme Court determined an undue burden occurs when "a state regulation has the purpose or effect of placing a substantial obstacle in the path of a woman seeking an abortion of a nonviable fetus." But as evidenced in the 5th Circuit decision, the definition and its myriad interpretations remain cloudy. In terms of purpose, the court tossed plaintiff claims suggesting the state failed to advance a legitimate health and safety interest, casting away their evidence as "purely anecdotal" while swallowing state claims and defendants' tes-

Next Stop for HB 2 – The Supreme Court?

Legal experts eye Texas law as the most likely abortion case to make it to the high court

timony whole, despite considerable evidence that much of that testimony was influenced by Vincent Rue, a discredited antichoice marriage counselor with no medical background.

The court then reasoned that even though many women would now be forced to travel more than 150 miles each way for an abortion procedure, not enough – or not a "large fraction" of women – would be impacted. Offering minimal respite,

the 5th Circuit did grant exception for a clinic in McAllen because women would now need to drive more than 200 miles; however, this means abortion care in all of South Texas largely rests on the shoulders of one doctor. Additionally, clinic leaders at Whole Woman's Health remain uncertain the exception will actually allow them to keep their doors open. Strangely, while the 5th Circuit previously ruled in a related Mississippi case that driving out of state for abortion care was too far, they didn't offer the same clearance in Texas. The court failed to grant an exemption for El Paso (more than 500 miles from the closest provider), claiming West Texas women can simply make the trip to neighboring Santa Teresa, N.M. for the appointment – logic that counters the law's ostensible claim of safety, as the bordering state isn't required to comply with the same rules in HB 2. In short: Driving farther for access in Texas is no big deal. University of Texas law professor

John Robertson said the 5th Circuit could have gone another – and in his opinion, more sensible – legal route.

The court examined the extent of the travel burden, not whether imposing such a burden to gain slight health benefits was in any way justified. "They upheld the law not taking into account that the surgery center requirement is not really needed in almost all cases; it's overkill," he said. "If they had balanced it out, they would have factored in making people drive so far to a

mini-hospital when it's not necessary is not acceptable." Yet, the 5th throws out the balancing approach altogether: "In our circuit, we do not balance the wisdom or effectiveness of a law against the burdens the law imposes," they write.

"The Supreme Court is going to have to resolve whether the balancing view or the narrow 5th Circuit view is the appropriate way to interpret undue burden," said Robertson. "And so, this is potentially the case which the court will take to clarify it." And unlike a federal district court ruling that found HB 2 unconstitutional, the 5th Circuit, while acknowledging access may be more challenging for low-income women, didn't seriously factor in the barriers - such as cost, child care, immigration status, and time off work rural, minority, or poor women face. In fact, the conservative court reiterated an especially callous abortion-related 1980 Supreme Court ruling that absolves the state completely: "The financial constraints that restrict an indigent woman's ability to enjoy the full range of con-

stitutionally protected freedom of choice are the product not of governmental restrictions on access to abortions, but rather of her indigency." Plaintiffs don't mince words when

Plaintiffs don't mince words when describing the court's rationalization, stressing that the 5th Circuit "flagrantly disregarded" nearly half a century of Supreme Court precedent.

"The 5th Circuit opinion suggests that if you look at every issue narrowly enough and in isolation and without context you can get around the holdings of the Supreme Court," said David Brown, staff attorney with the Center for Reproductive Rights. "And the result is that they create an impossible standard for women seeking to vindicate their right to choose abortion," because they must prove there is no way to obtain one while disregarding all the challenges to access. "As long as there is a theoretical way that she can have [an abortion] at some point in her pregnancy then nothing else matters."

WHAT COMES NEXT

A request to the 5th Circuit to stay its own decision was denied, as expected, on June 19, and plaintiffs have now turned to the U.S. Supreme Court for relief, asking for a temporary injunction to keep the law from going into effect next week; regardless of what the high court decides in the interim,

SHIFT-ING ABORTION TALK

Forced to close their doors after the bulk of **HB 2** went into effect last year, the **Whole Woman's Health Clinic** flagship center in North Austin off I-35 lay vacant for six months. When anti-choice activists set their sights on transforming the former holistic abortion care clinic into an unregulated, anti-choice **crisis pregnancy center**, Whole Woman's Health founder and CEO **Amy Hagstrom Miller** felt compelled to act. "I said, 'We can't let this happen," Miller told the *Chronicle*. "I called up our biggest donors and told them, 'Let's make lemons into lemonade."

After a burst of fundraising, Whole Woman's Health revived their defunct clinic – like a phoenix from the ashes – into **Shift**, a nonprofit meant to eradicate the cultural **stigma** surrounding abortion. A combination of storytelling, art activism (a contest for a mural on the side of Whole Woman's McAllen clinic recently started), and education, Shift – led by Miller, deputy director **Fatimah Gifford**, and program manager **Amanda Williams** – isn't political or research-driven; rather, its goal is to redefine the way people think and talk about abortion with the help of those who understand it best – the actual providers. For instance, Miller's **Abortion 101** class invites community members to walk through what happens during an abortion appointment – from the phone call, to the procedure, to when a woman exits the clinic. "We hope to create a safe place for progressives to explore information about abortion," said Miller. "We try to create an open and honest environment where we can not only explain medical procedures but field questions about moral and ethical dilemmas from pro-choice people who may face some things that make them uncomfortable." Shift also runs a Real Talk hotline to direct women to the closest provider and connect them with financial assistance. And they've launched a billboard and radio campaign to simply inform the public that abortion is still legal in Texas – a needed clarification for many women confused by the law, said Miller. The building, equipped with rooms dedicated to pro-choice champions such as **Molly Ivins** and state Rep. **Jessica Farrar**, D-Houston, additionally serves as a coworking space, dubbed **ChoiceWorks**, for allied groups. "Any opportunity we can get to say 'Can we make something good out of this?' or 'Is there something left here that we can still offer the community?' amid the real evisceration of the health care system helps us feel like we have some dignity," said Miller. "We'll take the tiny little victories; we haven't had many." – Mary Tuma

plaintiffs plan to appeal to the court for a full reversal based on merits. Abortion cases before the Supremes have become increasingly rare, leading observers to believe SCOTUS has intentionally evaded the hotly politicized issue. While roughly two dozen abortion-related decisions were made by the Supreme Court between *Roe v*. Wade in 1973 and Casey in 1992, justices have ruled on just two major cases since then. Presently, the court has the opportunity to hear a case out of Mississippi that could result in the closure of that state's lone abortion clinic. But that case is in preliminary stages of legal proceedings, where-

as the Texas law is much further along, having gone through a full trial. Given that, a few favorable signs SCOTUS fuel from optimism for the prochoice legal team that the court could take up abortion, using the Texas case as the national model.

One, last week justices declined to hear an appeal of the 4th Circuit's decision to

strike down North Carolina's pre-abortion ultrasound law, in effect leaving the antichoice rule to wither away. Two, the Supreme Court previously blocked HB 2, preventing it from taking effect in October, albeit temporarily. "The fact that the Supreme Court has already acted is a real strong indication they're interested in this case," said Jan Soifer, Austin-based counsel to local abortion providers in the case. "When it vacated the 5th Circuit stay they had to conclude the 5th Circuit was wrong, which is a good sign that they'll continue to conclude the 5th Circuit is incorrect in their reasoning."

And finally, there's the need for clarity. In just the past four years alone, states have passed a combined total of 231 abortion restrictions, according to the Guttmacher Institute. The number of states with "hostile" abortion restrictions in effect skyrocketed from 13 in 2000 to 27 in 2014 (including 18 considered "extremely hostile"); today, the entire South is considered hostile to abortion rights. As abortion laws - and the litigation that almost certainly follows become increasingly common across the nation, circuit courts have diverged on rulings, which may help drive the Supreme Court's urgency to clear up uncertainty. For instance, while the 5th Circuit applied a narrow approach, the 7th and 9th Circuit courts have used a balancing test for undue

burden that weighs the obstacles for women against the state's purported health interest. Given all this, Brown voices confidence in appealing to SCOTUS: "I think we have a good chance of getting before the court, and winning before the court."

Meanwhile, abortion providers, held hostage by the will of the judiciary for years now, brace for the full and

crippling impact of HB 2. The first three parts of the law have already been enacted. Physicians must secure admitting privileges at a hospital within 30 miles of the clinic where they perform the procedure; patients must adhere to outdated FDA protocol when ingesting abortion medication; and women are barred from abortion after 20 weeks of pregnancy. The effect has been that the number of abortion clinics in Texas has been sliced in half, from 41 to 17.

"Nobody is fooled by the fact that state legislators, unable to make abortion flat-out illegal, are using these regulations to make certain the impact on women is nearly the same as if it were illegal," said Soifer. "We hope the Supreme Court sees through it, too."

The law of turkey-baster insemination took a turn in Virginia in April when mother Joyce Bruce was unable to keep sperm-provider Robert Boardwine out of her son's life. Bruce relied on a state statute that seemed to allow her sole parenthood if the pregnancy was based on assistedreproduction medical technology. However, the Court of Appeals of Virginia declared that a "kitchen implement" is not "medical technology" and, considering Boardwine's genuine interest in fatherhood, ruled that he was entitled to joint custody and visitation rights.

What Cannibals Can Teach Us

Researchers studying the human-brain-eating Fore tribe of Papua New Guinea reported in a June journal article that they have identified the specific "prion" resistance gene that appears to offer complete protection against mad cow disease and perhaps other neurodegenerative conditions such as dementias and Parkinson's. The tribe customarily dined on relatives' brains at funerals (although it has abandoned the practice) and consequently suffered a major epidemic in the Fifties that wiped out 2% of the tribe annually. According to the lead researcher, survivors, with the specific resistance gene, demonstrated "a striking example of Darwinian evolution in humans."

Recurring Themes (All-New Episodes!)

Spouses often disagree politically and vote accordingly, but occasionally one runs for office against the other – as is the case in Bremerton, Wash., where incumbent Council Member Roy Runyon is being challenged by his wife, Kim Faulkner. Both were mum as to reasons and in fact filed their registration papers together at the same time in May. Said Runyon: "We're different people. She might have a different approach."

India's media reported in April yet another birth defect in which the surviving baby is treated as a representation of Hindu holiness. A four-armed, four-legged child (medical explanation: remains of an underdeveloped conjoined twin) is worshipped as the reincarnation of the multi-limbed Lord Ganesha, and pilgrims journey from all over India to the birthplace, Dumri-Isri in the state of Jharkhand. (In a nod to modernity, one witness told a reporter that initially he had thought a photograph of the child was Photoshopped, but now has seen the baby with his own eyes.)

Another "Human Right": In April, London's *Daily Mail* spotted Anna Broom of Gillingham declaring that, despite her various disorders that keep her from working, she nonetheless imagines a first-class wedding with Champagne, horse-drawn carriage, and Mexico honeymoon – all at government expense – because that would be her "human right." She told a reporter that a small ceremony at a government office would not boost her confidence, but that her "dream" wedding would be just the thing to get her back on a job search.

The most recent exposition of people who tattoo their eyeballs, at the International Tattoo Festival in Caracas in February, featured the phenomenon's founder, Mr. Luna Cobra, who said it all started when he tried to create "bright blue" eyes, as in the 1984 film Dune. (Pigment is injected, permanently, so that it rests under the eye's thin top layer, the conjunctiva.) Asked what the process feels like, devotee Kylie Garth told BBC News, "It was mentally intense," resembling an eye poke, pressure, and "a bit of sand" - but "no pain." Mr. Cobra urged young people to get their jobs before trying eye tats, since "you're going to look frightening forever to the majority of people you encounter."

Once again, in May, lawyers went to court trying to persuade a judge that some rights under the U.S. Constitution be extended to intelligent apes (here, chimpanzees, as "autonomous and self-determining beings" at least as perceptive as, for example, severely mentally ill people, who retain rights while institutionalized). Lawyers are once again asking for a writ of habeas corpus (now available only to humans) to take Hercules and Leo out of a lab and into a sanctuary. (Adding to the discussion, in the week after the court hearing, a Harvard professor and colleagues, writing in the journal Current Anthropology, hypothesized that chimps could cook foods if given the chance. Tests revealed that they resist raw food when they are able to place it into a device that made it taste better which in theory makes them more intelligent than children who eat cookie dough.)

Baffling Perversion: Some men are compelled to express unrequited love for women by elaculating onto them or into their beverages. The Minnesota Legislature is working to upgrade its law (since a recent defendant, John Robert Lind, was acquitted of adulterating his co-worker's coffee on the ground that current law requires actually touching the victim). However, Lind (who admitted a total of six climaxes against the co-worker) is an amateur compared to Tetsuya Fukuda, 40, who was finally apprehended in April. at which time he admitted "more than 100" semen attacks on women on trains near Kinshicho, Japan, dating back to 2011. He told police, "I get excited when in close contact with a woman on a crowded train."

Updates on Previous "News of the Weird"

"News of the Weird" has remarked on modern, over-the-top versions of the centuries-old tradition in China of making funerals entertaining, to attract mourners and thereby signify that the deceased did not die "faceless." In the recent past, festive song-and-dance acts were hired, and soon, in the competition for attendees, some families took to hiring strippers to perform – even "obscene" acts, "severely pollut[ing]" the culture, according to a critic. In April, the Ministry of Culture, previously somewhat tolerant because of sensitivity for the families, formally denounced the practice and began detaining the traveling performers.

Backyard firing ranges are legal in Florida (as "News of the Weird" reported last year), and in March, a Florida House committee voted to keep it that way, shooting down legislation to outlaw them even in urban and residential areas. (Firing on private property is legal except if shooting over a public right-ofway or an occupied dwelling, and "negligent" gunfire, though illegal, is only a misdemeanor.) In 2014, one Florida legislator, originally from Alaska, said even in that liberty-conscious state, residents in urban Anchorage do not have rights that Floridians have.



Come and Don't Get It

YOU *HAVE* A JOB; YOU DON'T NEED TO MAKE ANOTHER ONE OUT OF FIGURING OUT ART

The word came right from the artistic director herself: In the dance we were about to see, there was nothing to "get." No weighty symbols, no coded messages. Just bodies moving through space in a movement exercise that she – Kathy Dunn Hamrick – had undertaken with four other choreographers to shake up her usual creative process. We in the audience were free to let the dance wash over us, to "people-watch for the next

hour," she said. And as Arts writer Jonelle Seitz noted in her Chronicle review of KDH Dance's More Than One Complication, "Hamrick's permission to detach – to be voyeurs, lurkers – was a welcome reprieve."

I felt it myself, that wave of relief, of being let off the hook for some interpretation of the work I was about to see. Indeed, I may have

sighed more than most. See, just two days before, I'd been over at Women & Their Work, looking at the Olivia Moore exhibit "Between Here and There," and as I was wandering among the installation's biergarten benches, steel booth frame, and wheel-like sections of rolled-up posters, that pressure started sneakily gathering at the back of my brain, the pressure to get what the artist meant by all of it. For whatever reason, Moore's work and I weren't speaking the same language and rather than let that just be the case and simply observe and respond to what I saw, some part of me felt compelled to treat the gallery like a crime scene, gathering clues in order to form some theory of her artistic intent and meaning.

I've written about this before, my proclivity to engage intellectually with art on contact and keep my brain processing what I take in,

actively sifting through the input for layers and patterns. In doing so, I've laid a certain amount of the blame for that at the feet of my profession: Critics are expected to deliver their take on whatever exhibition, concert, or play they've experienced, ingesting the art and instantly disgorging an astute analysis of form, function, content, and context. But now I don't

feel the condition's limited to those of us who spout our opinions for pay – why else would Hamrick have told the entire audience not to worry about getting her dance?

That, I fear, is a reflection of this mindset going pandemic, afflicting more folks than not when they confront contemporary art today. Face to face with music or sculpture or theatre or dance that's rooted in the creator's deeply personal vocabulary, that seems seeded with obscure meanings, we reflexively set out to unearth them, to dig up the buried treasure. In itself, that impulse isn't awful; it's establishing a connection with the art and drawing us closer to it. But when that's all we're inspired to do, when the only point is to unlock the puzzle, then we reduce art to the level of a Highlights Hidden Pictures page – actually, to something worse. Finding what's hidden on the Highlights page is fun - we approach it as a game. We approach deciphering the meaning in art as something important and grave, a chore. That's why Hamrick's "permission to detach" was so welcome: We were getting out of a job.

To see art as a task, as a duty, as work, is to blind ourselves to many of the aspects that make art worthwhile: the passion it displays, the beauty of its form, the simple spark of creativity behind it. When I was so focused on getting under the skin of Moore's exhibit at Women & Their Work, I was overlooking the obvious pleasures there: the sumptuous shades of orange utilized in the tiles of her entry wall, the care with which her

Ghost Station's steel frame was constructed, the subtle graininess and flecks of color in the pulped posters pasted on the wall and illuminated. Never mind buried treasure. Here were riches right on the surface. But it took a certain disconnection from my mental process to realize that.

So it proved with Hamrick's work. No need to divine the motivations behind the motions; tracking the highly charged, crisply coordinated, kinetic movements of the eight dancers - or of the half-dozen percussionists hammering out the live score behind them - was sufficient to derive satisfaction, or certainly stimulation, from the performance. And it turned out being open to the work on that level meant I was open to it in other ways as well, to its tensions, its seductions, its surprises, its gifts. But I might have missed out on all that had I been subsumed in my usual job of thinking through the work instead of letting it play over me. I'm grateful to Kathy Dunn Hamrick for saving me from that work. It gave me the opportunity to be more present for the work with my brain turned off.


Think about that the next time you catch yourself thinking too much in the gallery or the playhouse or the concert hall. You aren't at work, so take your mind off the clock and see what happens.

ow to write about the memoir of an iconic Texas scribe whose life has been way more interesting/wild/ chaotic than yours? Use his words.

"On the road home to Brownwood in her green '74 Cadillac with the custom upholstery and the CB radio, clutching a pawn ticket, for her \$3,000 mink, Candy Barr thought about biscuits. Biscuits made her think of fried chicken, which in turn suggested potato salad and corn. For as long as she could remember, in times of crisis and stress, Candy Barr always thought of groceries. It was a miracle she didn't look like a platinum pumpkin, but she didn't: even at 41, she still looked like a movie star."

Thus begins Gary Cartwright's 1976 *Texas Monthly* profile of the state's most notorious stripper, a story that in many ways cemented a style of inserting himself into the narrative. It's a technique that served him well in writing the memoir *The Best I Recall* (University of Texas Press, 272 pp., \$27.95) When UT Press asked him to pen the book, he realized details of events from party days of yore were often hazy.

"Even though I wasn't the topic I was writing about, I wrote in first person a lot," Cartwright, now 80, said recently from his Central Austin home. "So I could go back and re-read stories from *Texas Monthly* and other magazines and get a timeline of what I'd done and when I'd done it. I put it together by going to school on myself."

Cartwright had a longstanding desire to meet Candy Barr going back to his Army discharge when a buddy and he showed up in Dallas at Abe Weinstein's Colony Club with a bottle of whiskey in the days pre-liquor-by-the-drink. They weren't (yet) drunk, but an overzealous cop threw them in jail anyway. Candy Barr had to wait.

Barr had quashed previous attempts to interview her, including one by the famed writer Gay Talese, but Cartwright knew a stripper named Chastity who knew Candy. "She was beautiful, she was famous, she was mysterious, and nobody had written about her," he says. "I would follow her around the house and try to interview her. It was going nowhere. A couple of times I thought, 'Screw this. I'll just leave.' But I didn't. So I wrote about experiencing Candy Barr. That's one thing I learned. You have an idea of what the story will be, but it doesn't work out that way. There's still a story there. It's another story, and it's probably as interesting or more interesting than what you've conceptualized."

Cartwright's life swirls in the interesting. The memoir cuts it into four distinct chapters: the early *Mad Men*-esque years in the Metroplex newspaper game, the drughazy Seventies, the *Texas Monthly* years, and the final truths/sadnesses of growing older. Underlying themes run through it: an ability to be in the right place at the right time surrounded by the right people, a rage against the humdrum life he saw others leading, and a churning battle with the belief that he somehow didn't deserve it all. "That's probably a reflection of my char-

acter that seeps out," he says. "You don't

That Wild Man

Gary Cartwright: The mad, mad, mad life of a Texas wordsmith

know what you're doing, but you know that if you keep doing it, it'll work. There always comes a time in a story, whether it's a magazine story or a book, where you realize you're on to something. Most writers I know had a plan, but I never had enough foresight to have a plan."

Credit the original spark to Emma Ousley, a journalism and English teacher at Arlington High School who made her students free-write to start every class. "People said, 'Write what?' She said, 'I don't care. Just write.' I wrote. I thought, 'This is great.' I would write a sentence, then I'd write another sentence. It was great fun." One day Ousley pulled him aside and pointed out his writing talent. "It floored

me," Cartwright says. "Nobody had ever felt I had a talent for anything."

As a *Fort Worth Press* paperboy, Cartwright became a fan of Blackie Sherrod, a newspaper columnist and sportswriter. After a stint as a *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* cops reporter and an ill-advised stretch in advertising, Cartwright landed under Sherrod's guidance as part of what would become an allstar sportswriting team. Sitting across from him were Bud Shrake and Dan Jenkins.

Sherrod "took us under his wing and taught us how to be newspapermen, not sportswriters," Cartwright says. "Sportswriters tended to be what we called homers. They think of the home team as being we, part of our family. If you're a newspaper guy, you think objectively. That attitude changed over the years partly because of writers like me, Jenkins, Shrake, and particularly Blackie."

The sports team also embraced a hardpartying lifestyle with lots of booze and lots of women. "That's how everybody I knew lived," he says. "Everybody I knew was divorced, so when I got married for the first time, I think I figured in seven years I'd be divorced, and I was."

He ended up sharing an apartment with Shrake just north of downtown Dallas where, when the bars closed, late-night parties percolated. A regular houseguest was a flame-haired stripper named Jada who worked in one of Jack Ruby's clubs. "She was a wild woman," Cartwright says. "She had long, long fingernails. She was a cat woman. She wasn't much of a dancer, but she was fairly sensational. She'd hump on a tiger skin rug." Ruby would show up at the apartment looking for her, usually armed. "Ruby loved Jada, but he hated that act. She'd tell him to go screw himself."

Later, Cartwright, now remarried, joined Shrake in waving to President Kennedy's motorcade moments before JFK was assassinated. The sportswriters were in Cleveland for a football game that the Dallas Cowboys inexplicably agreed to play the following Sunday, the day Ruby shot suspected assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

"Tve never been through a time like that," Cartwright says. "That's why it was so stunning that the Cowboys played a game that Sunday. Nobody wanted to play a game. Nobody wanted to watch a game. Everybody just went through the motions."

Cartwright's second wife, Jo, had purchased a convertible in Ohio, and the two drove back to Dallas via Nashville. "We were in no hurry to get anywhere," he says. "The world had just stopped. Everybody felt like something else was about to happen. This was the start of a revolution – something. An unnamed thing that couldn't be good. Life continued, but it would never be the same."

Shrake triggered a change in Cartwright's career path. He and Jenkins both headed to New York City to write for *Sports Illustrated*, and Cartwright followed as a freelancer. Jenkins, whom Cartwright considered the best pure sportswriter he'd ever met, had branched into fiction with *Semi-Tough*, a rollicking comic novel about pro football starring Billy Clyde Puckett, a character he'd created for column fodder back in their newspaper days. Shrake was even more serious about writing fiction.

"Everybody admired Bud," Cartwright says. "He was a big guy -6'6" – and very dynamic. He was a natural liar. He always knew he was going to be a novelist. I just sort of followed his lead."

Shrake advised him to just write one sentence at a time, so Cartwright sat down and did just that. The result was 1968's *The Hundred-Yard War*. "I thought it was going to be about pro football because that's what I knew," Cartwright says. "I'd covered the Dallas Texans (now the Kansas City Chiefs) and later the Dallas Cowboys. So I wrote a sentence. Then I wrote another sentence. A story developed." His main character was modeled after charismatic Cowboys quarterback Don Meredith. The coach was originally a take on Cowboys coach Tom Landry, but Cartwright found Landry too enigmatic to grasp and went instead with a Vince Lombardi-esque coach whose explosive, egotistical personality was more fun to put down on paper.

"It taught me I could write a book," Cartwright says. "Later, there were a lot of things I'd wished I'd known beforehand. I would have restructured the book or dwelled more on certain characters and less on others. But there's no way to write

than to sit down and do it."

An editor talked him into penning a second novel, *Thin Ice*, set in the world of hockey, a sport the Texan knew little about. "They offered pretty good money at a time when I needed money, so I said, 'Sure,'" Cartwright recalls. "To solve the problem of not knowing anything about the game, I made my lead character a goalie, thinking that at least he'd stay in one place. I also decided he'd be going blind."

Shrake and Cartwright were dreamers and provocateurs prone to dressing up in capes as the Flying Punzars, a supposed foreign circus act. During a road trip, they only half-jokingly talked of producing their own movies and publishing their own books, and thus created Mad Dog, an actual corporation whose motto was "doing indefinable service to mankind." Cartwright calls it the "world's longest practical joke."

When a Western screenplay of Shrake's called *Dime Box* was being shot in Durango, Mexico (as *Kid Blue*), Mad Dog showed up with a Winnebago and a smaller van festooned with Mad Dog Productions banners. Dennis Hopper starred as an outlaw trying to go straight. "He was totally crazy at the

time," Cartwright says. "He had just come off *Easy Rider*, which was a huge success. He was a movie star in a day when movie stars had just about ceased to exist. He played the role. He was a pain in the ass, but refreshing." Hopper was soon inducted into the membership of Mad Dog.

As part of their corporate activity, Shrake and Cartwright filmed a fake moviewithin-a-movie titled *The Congressman's Carrot*, a joke that involved Cartwright pulling back his jacket to reveal a carrot in his vest pocket. The craziness hit its crescendo at the New Year's Mad Dog Masked Ball where a crowd including writer Peter Gent (*North Dallas Forty*), actor Warren Oates, and Don Meredith mingled and partygoers sampled vanilla-flavored LSD and, as concocted by Cartwright and his wife Jo, marijuana cookies that packed a 12-hour punch. Meredith and his girlfriend, unaware of the secret ingredient, were wolfing them down.

"Life was really boring back then," Cartwright says of Mad Dog. "Nobody was taking chances. Nobody was pushing the envelope. I wanted to make things happen. One way was to be as outrageous as we could and see where the chips fell."

Cartwright said his life's third act was a "lapse into journalism."

"Fact and fiction come together," he says. "There's a narrow line. My first two books were fiction, so I taught myself to write

while writing fiction. *Texas Monthly* came along, and I got into long-form journalism. I really liked that and understood it because I'd written long-form fiction. I'd learned to trust my instincts. You learn by doing. You learn by failing. You learn by trying."

quickly became Crime Cartwright's forte. His tale of Dallas businessman Cullen Davis' trials for murder grew into two Texas Monthly pieces and the 1979 book Blood Will Tell, which was then made into the TV movie Texas Justice. Convicted cop killer Randall Dale Adams wrote to Cartwright from death row. Cartwright's Texas Monthly piece and Errol Morris' 1988 documentary The Thin Blue Line led to a reversal of the conviction. "The cops had stacked the deck against him," Cartwright says. "They had an unsolved cop killing, and he fell into their hands. I didn't particularly like Randall Dale Adams. He didn't have a personality. He's not the guy you'd like to have a beer with, but I thought he'd gotten screwed over."

Cartwright knows that some folks think of him as "that wild man, that crazy man," but the frivolity has been tinged with its share of sadness. He reconnected with his son Mark when the boy came to study at UT. They

became more like friends than father and son. Mark called his father Jap, a nickname from his *Fort Worth Press* days. Then in 1996, Mark was diagnosed with leukemia. "He was so tough and resilient," Cartwright says. "I thought he'd come through it, but he didn't."

By his side through it all was Phyllis, the wife who stuck. Cartwright's first two marriages were short and fiery – he admits in the book to hitting each of his first two wives in the jaw – but Phyllis was the one. They had plans to celebrate their 30th anniversary in France when she was diagnosed with cancer and died in a few months. Cartwright later remarried, but his wife Tam also died of cancer.

"You go on living," he says. "You do the best you can. I've always had an upbeat attitude. I don't dwell on what I can't change."



The Game's Afoot

Sherlock takes a comic turn in Penfold Theatre's three-actor spin on The Hound of the Baskvervilles

Recent years have shown there are just so many directions you can take the Sherlock Holmes stories. Many of the latest dramatizations have been dark, modern interpretations of the idea of the tortured genius. Not this time! Penfold Theatre Company mounts this

new adaptation of The Hound of the Baskervilles by Steven Canny and John Nicholson for its annual family-friendly outdoor show, staged at the Round Rock Amphitheater. This telling of the Gothic mystery gives a nod to the dark suspense in Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's original story, but beyond that, it's more comedy than thriller. The humor is broad and accessible, powered by the slapstick physicality and great timing of the small cast under Emily Rankin's direction.

As the story goes, Sherlock Holmes (Eva

McQuade) and his loyal but, in this version, feckless assistant Dr. Watson (Ryan Crowder) are asked to protect the final heir in the Baskerville line (Toby Minor) from the family curse: a huge, mysterious hound that has murdered previous Baskervilles in the swampy moors surrounding the estate. Each of the three

actors plays several roles among the colorful lineup of suspicious characters who greet the heroes upon their arrival. Despite Watson's silliness, Sir Henry Baskerville's stubbornness, Holmes' arrogance, and the occasional freight train that passes near the amphitheater, they eventually prevail. THE HOUND OF THE

While this production of The Hound of the Baskervilles wouldn't exactly qualify as theatre for young audiences, it's goofy enough that pretty much any kid whose bedtime will let her stay up for the performance ought to enjoy herself. Audiences of any age should should admire the physical talents of the three actors, especially Minor. If you watch for them, there are moments when it's obvious that this is a cast of actors who have studied their craft for years.

Folks hoping for some Benedict Cumberbatch fanfic will be disappointed. Sherlock Holmes purists and experts on the Victorian-Edwardian periods may also find themselves let down. But taken for what it is - a G-rated summer show to be enjoyed with an evening picnic – Penfold's The Hound of the Baskervilles satisfies.





Booze, jazz, and speakeasies hold an allure all their own, but throw Bob Fosse into the mix and you know you've taken a trip to Chicago. Any lover of musicals is likely to know the Kander & Ebb sensation, and even those who don't fall into this category probably have some familiarity with Rob Marshall's 2002 film version, which boasts an all-star cast and multiple Academy Awards. For musical neophytes and aficionados alike. Chicago is seen as a classic, and staging such a well-known work comes with its set of difficulties. Austin Playhouse's production

boasts a talented group of familiar Austin faces, and though the evening is entertaining overall, a bit more technical flair and tightening up would give this show the extra oomph it needs.

The story tracks aspiring jazz baby Roxie Hart, who has been imprisoned for murdering Fred Casely, with whom she was having an affair. Sara Burke gives an excellent turn in this role, alternately bringing out Roxie's innocent and manipulative characteristics. Like her character, Burke is a star on the rise, stealing the show in every production I've seen her in.

Once in prison, Roxie meets her idol, fellow jazz performer Velma Kelly, who was also recently convicted of murder. Rachel James tackles the role, and though she has a beautiful singing voice, she does not always exude the confidence and charisma that's integral to Velma's character. That's not to say James

is a bad performer, just that her sometimes demure performance might work better in the role of Roxie. Had James and Burke switched roles, I believe the production would have been more believable overall.

Huck Huckaby, on the other hand, is solidly cast as the deviant "silver-tongued prince of the courtroom," Roxie's defense attorney Billy Flynn. He maintains a strong stage presence and seems to enjoy himself in the role while making it clear that Flynn's only interest apart from money - is himself.

Somewhat ironically, one of the performers who commands the most attention plays the character who repeatedly claims to be overlooked. As Roxie's husband Amos, Scott Shipman gives a funny and delightful turn, as well as an impressive rendition of "Mister Cellophane."

Though the execution of Danny Herman and Rocker Verastique's choreography could use some tightening to really exude that Fosse flair, the members of the chorus do a nice job emoting and reacting to the action. Of particular note is the always fabulous Molly Karrasch, whose hilarious and unique delivery of her monologue in "Cell Block Tango" is not to be missed. Claire Grasso also gives a delightful performance as the sharp-tongued newest murderer on the block, Go-to-Hell Kitty.

Lyn Koenning's musical direction and Buffy Manners' costumes punch up the razzledazzle and bring the audience back to the Jazz Age. Unfortunately, the same cannot be said of Desiderio Roybal's set design or Don Day's lighting, both of which are far too minimalistic for a play that requires a high level of showmanship. Despite these few technical shortcomings, this cast's hard work and talent shines through, delivering a solid production of this beloved musical. - Elissa Russell

As I sat listening to the overture that opens Gilbert & Sullivan's *The Sorcerer*, I noticed out of the corner of my eye a hint of movement in the row in front of me. Glancing over, it became clear that a budding conductor was in our midst. The child waved her pencil in tandem with maestro Jeffrey Jones-Ragona's baton (and quite well, I might add), quietly internalizing the buoyant quality of Sir Arthur Sullivan's music. A couple of seats to her left sat a woman with a similar response. During a section of music in triple meter, her head bobbed happily with the downbeat. As the overture came to its final cadence, she instinctively provided a small cutoff with her hand at the appropriate moment.

Live music – there's nothing quite like it. And there's plenty of it to behold in this Gilbert & Sullivan Society of Austin production, with its 19-piece orchestra and expansive company of onstage voices. A formative (if somewhat obscure) installment in the Gilbert & Sullivan canon, *The Sorcerer* follows the philanthropic plot of Alexis Pointdextre (portrayed here by Holton Johnson) to instill the happiness of romance in all the citizens of his native Ploverleigh. To accomplish his goal, Pointdextre enlists the services of John Wellington Wells (of J.W. Wells & Co., Family Sorcerers) to provide a potion that, once ingested, will cause one to fall madly in love

with the first person she or he encounters. It doesn't take magical powers to predict the twists and turns this premise sets in motion.

The GSSA cast features some lovely voices, particularly those of the aforementioned Johnson, and Alexandra Reilman as Pointdextre's dramatically betrothed Aline. Arthur DiBianca is especially comical in the title role, as is Janette Jones as the highly heightened Mrs. Partlet. I don't personally find *The Sorcerer* to be as witty or riotous as many of Gilbert & Sullivan's subsequent and better known collaborations, but there are still many smiles to be had from it, for sure. As a friend I bumped into at intermission remarked, "It'd be hard not to have fun."

I get the biggest smile, though, when I think back to those two patrons in the row in front of me – generations removed from each other yet both exhibiting a shared joy for Sullivan's overture. Each felt the strains of music in her own way, and neither was afraid to imagine what it would be like to raise a baton and take part in the music making. With one of the largest orchestras in a pit around town, the Gilbert & Sullivan Society provides its patrons, cast and crew members, and instrumentalists the opportunity to experience classic light opera fare in a variety of ways, as it has for 39 years. And that's something to sing about. – Adam Roberts

The airship that destroyed Judge Proctor's windmill, water tank, and flower garden in Aurora left behind more mysteries than debris.

An article in *The Dallas Morning News* on April 17, 1897, says residents of the community north of Fort Worth were awakened early in the morning by an explosion. Sifting through the aircraft's wreckage, residents found a body "that was not an inhabitant of this world."

According to the article's author, S.E. Haydon, an officer of the U.S. Army Signal Corps and expert on astronomy speculated that the pilot was "a native of the planet Mars." No explanation was given as to how the official knew what a person from the faraway planet might look like.

Supposedly, the pilot was buried in the Aurora Cemetery and the wreckage was

dumped down the judge's well. No concrete evidence of the spaceship has turned up after 118 years of searching by UFO investigators, but conspiracy theories abound.

One of Haydon's contemporaries accused him of being the town's practical joker. Several commentators have suggested that he was trying to prop up a fading town struck by a series of disasters. The 1986 movie *The Aurora Encounter* helps keep the legend alive.

The Aurora Cemetery, where the spaceman is supposedly buried in an unmarked grave, is a few miles west of U.S. 287 on Cemetery Road, off TX 114 between Rhome and Boyd. Aurora is a smattering of homes, but the historical marker at the cemetery mentions the extraterrestrial legend. So it must be true.

Home Away From Home

The Austin Aztex's home-away-fromhome opener last Saturday was a considerable success - they drew a pretty good crowd to Round Rock ISD's Kelly Reeves Athletic Complex, despite the rain and a one-hour lightning delay; they put together a nice game-day experience, in difficult circumstances; and on the field, they outplayed the Tulsa Roughnecks pretty much throughout, before what looked like a phantom penalty call in the 85th minute allowed the visitors to scratch back a 1-1 draw. After the game, coach Paul Dalglish noted that three games in six days had taken their toll; his team looked perhaps a step slow in the second half, after bowing out of the U.S. Open Cup on Wednesday night, losing 2-0 to the Houston Dynamo.

Perhaps the coolest feature of the new venue: The Aztex struck a deal with Capital Metro to offer ticket-holders a free train ride to and from the game, including a shuttle bus between Lakeline Station, the stadium, and the League Tavern, now the official pre- and postgame location, where Aztex players will join fans for their post-game meal, and a latenight happy hour. The Women's World Cup: The Final Eight

The quarterfinals are this Friday and Saturday, with the semifinals next Tuesday and Wednesday, and the final on Sunday, July 5. Brief previews below, but to start on the geopolitical level: By confederation, the final eight features three **European** nations, two **Asian**, and two **North American**. It also features **England** and its three **most successful colonies**, and it includes each of the world's **six largest** **economies**. (In fact, if you rank all the countries in the final by their gross domestic product, only No. 7 Brazil is missing from the final eight, upset by No. 9 Australia.) The remaining schedule:

Quarterfinals: June 26-27

Fri., 3pm: Germany-France (Fox, NBC Universo) Clearly the two best teams in the tournament so far, meeting in the first quarterfinal: Both play aggressive, pressing defense; both have dynamic attacking combinations. Should be the game of the year. Fri., 6:30pm: USA-China (Fox, En Vivo Extra) The U.S. should be a heavy favorite against the only team left that's not in the top 10 in the world, but there's no flow to the American play, no combination play from anyone but Megan Rapinoe, and she's out of this game for yellow card accumulation. 

Smart Apples SUMMER SIPPING WITH ARGUS FERMENTABLES

As America's cider palate has expanded, brewers and bars have driven a renaissance of artisanal hard cider. Distinguished by yeasty complexity and crisp dryness, the style is a big hit at hot spots like New York's Wassail. Too bad for them that they don't have Argus Fermentables.

The trio behind Argus – Wes Mickel, Jeff Mickel, and Jules Peterson – began crafting wine-style ciders in 2010. Fermentables' Ciderkin and pear-based Ginger Perry grew from their desire to offer a year-round product. While their first product requires up to two years to age, they can now brew a consistent product that only requires a five-week production cycle. Launched in March, the funky drinks have hit the shelves in time for summer.

"Ciderkin" is the traditional term for cidermaking by fermenting reconstituted apple pulp. Since the pulp is diluted, the alcohol content is greatly reduced. The result is a dry apple cider with straightforward fruit flavors. The Ginger Perry is fermented from pears, ginger, and other natural aromatics.

The taste of both may be surprising, however, to those only familiar with national cider brands. "Everything we make is going to be dry," explains Wes. He notes that consumers often perceive ciders as being soda-like. "Steps are taken to make it sweet," he warns against products with added sugar or even corn syrup. By contrast, "fermentables are made with carefully sourced ingredients. ... The finished product is bottled without pasteurization or filtering," he says. The result is a drink that is still alive and active, with nothing to detract from the fruit.

Both varieties are tart, not unlike sour beer. The Ciderkin offers a clean apple flavor and earthy notes, while pears bring roundness to the Perry. Wes says that it could act as an alternative to ginger beer for cocktails.

Unlike their nationally distributed Cidery line, they are keeping this line strictly local for the time being. But they did recently acquire a new bottler and are working to increase capacity. The curious can find the vintagestyle amber bottles at major retailers like H-E-B and Spec's, as well as independent spots like Drink.Well, Odd Duck, and Quickie Pickie. And if our cider-crazed New York friends quote the right price, we might just start taking orders. – Melody Fury

Nice N Ful bounces back

Walk into Kenny Dorham's Backyard these days, and it's immediately apparent that something special is happening at the revamped East Austin venue. On a sunny Saturday afternoon, Bob Marley booms from speakers atop the live music stage as folks enjoy the Downtown skyline peeking behind huge shade trees. It has always been a community space, with scattered toys and neighborhood artwork. And now trailers such as the newly reopened Nice N Ful scatter the grounds too – making the familiar event space a food lover's paradise.

For five months last year, owners Myrna Nicely-Fulcher and Larry Fulcher ran their original Nice N Ful trailer outside Ideal Soul Mart, about a half mile down the road from their current digs. It was their first foray into the restaurant business for the busy couple, but word of mouth soon spread. Myrna, surely one of Austin's friendliest restaurateurs, served a small vegetarian menu of mostly burgers and à la carte treats under a cozy, reggae-filled canopy. About the time Austinites began to fall in love with the bold flavors of the tofu Thai burger - a week before the *Chronicle* was set to run an article about the trailer – life happened, and they suddenly decided to close shop.

But their business phone kept ringing,

and within a few weeks, Kenny Dorham's Backyard started calling, too. They'd saved Nice N Ful a spot. After a surprise cover story ran in the January issue of *AAA Travel* magazine, Larry and Myrna decided to reopen, just in time for SXSW 2015. "It's been a roller coaster ride," Myrna happily admits. Their new home now sits just a few blocks down from world-famous Franklin Barbecue and the Longbranch Inn – shar-

Incorporating music and community events into their schedule is almost as important as the food itself, making Kenny Dorham's the perfect spot for their vision. "There were tons of soul food places, and barbecue places, that were owned by

ing space with Arte & Son (Colombian cuisine with fresh juice), Wasota African Cuisine, and Bua Loy Thai Cuisine.

This may be Nice N Ful 2.0, but the focus is still the same. "We wanted to make it desirable for different people – all ethnicities, all income levels, all ages," explains Larry. "Food is universal. Food and music break barriers." The name Nice N Ful is a combination of their last names, and also serves as a longtime umbrella for all their ventures, including a music company. "We're indulgent in pleasure, so we're trying to establish and brand that music and food makes the soul happy," Myrna says. totally different demographic, we'd try to preserve some of this." Nice N Ful retains the spirit of those lost community

gathering spaces. Their sched-

ule is packed with events – Hump Day Happy Hour on Wednesdays, live music almost every night of the week, spoken word on Sundays, and more. Myrna says they've frequently welcomed new diners who wandered in from that hourslong line at Franklin. "They enjoy our food because it's tasty to people whether they eat meat or not. It's not like a cult club. It's a taste club."

For the couple, it's all about that explosion of spices and flavor. "[Vegetarian food] doesn't have to taste like somebody's shoe that you chewed on," quips Myrna. Their new menu, doubled in size, has many of the original favorites like the "chickn" nugget burger, but they've added several new items. There are a variety of burger and wrap options like Ethiopian potato, black bean, and falafel. Sides include a fresh kale salad and sweet potato fries that nail the crispy outside/soft inside ratio. They also serve veggie soft tacos with a variety of fixin's, and several Soul Bowl options, too. Myrna frequently whips up specials that end up on the permanent menu, like a recent stuffed tomato and black-eyed pea dish, or the "vegan-n-gluten-free prawns," sautéed in tandoori sauce, served over jasmine rice on a bed of kale salad. Their crave-worthy Soul Rolls - deep-fried egg roll wrappers filled with savory or sweet flavor bombs - are back with a vengeance, special every day. Last week I was lucky enough to try an in-theworks recipe: a custom spinach wrap with the rice and vegan sausage and veggie filling for an upcoming bell pepper dish. Delicious.

Neither Larry nor Myrna, who met on a blind date in the Seventies, were raised vegetarian, but they have enjoyed a plant-based diet for years. Myrna explained a time when they would go to Whataburger and have to say, 'Just hold the meat,' and still pay for the whole cheeseburger anyway. "You can imagine the looks you'd get when you went through the window," she reminisced. Larry, an inducted Blues Hall of Fame bassist for the Grammywinning Phantom Blues Band, comes from a family who owned "juke joints and livestock." His vegetarianism (save for an occasional "weakness for salmon") stems from the late Sixties "hippie movement" and decades of world travel. Tasting the spices from cuisines across the globe also inspires Myrna, an international flight attendant raised in an Air Force family. "It's the way we eat at home and it's recollections and memories from around the world ... a re-creation of what a soul food house could be." Their daughter, Dominique, a teacher, is the "sexy chef" coming in this

summer, and Myrna says her vegan co-chef plans to incorporate some "low calorie, no guilt" items with a Middle Eastern flair she picked up while at college in France.

But whatever the culinary influence, it's still soul food. "Both of us are African-American and we grew up eating, you know, 'black food,'" explains Larry. "I played reggae for a long, long time, and traveling, I got to taste that food from the West African diaspora, and

that way of flavoring and seasoning food, that vibe and rhythm you put in the food. We try to incorporate that to keep that culture, but do it in a healthy manner."

Myrna says, "It's so funny that everyone always associates soul food with an ethnic food. We say we're giving you soul in your food, and it's food for the soul. Nothing dies; everything is fresh."

Desolation Angel

ON THE CULT OF CINEMA by Marc Saviov



There's a timeless, otherworldly image in director Ana Lily Amirpour's mesmeric feature debut *A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night*. It haunts you, to the bone. The vampire, played to unnerving, dark perfection by Sheila Vand, skates down a moonlit road, her chador flapping in the night air and looking for all the world like the wings of a bat. Except, as Amirpour explains, that's not Vand up there onscreen.

"Do I ride a skateboard?" the director says in answer to my question. "Yeah, that was me in the film, skating down that narrow street. I started skating when I was 17."

The desperate characters in Amirpour's dreamy, monochrome "Iranian vampire spaghetti Western love story" are looking to escape their Bad City however they can: drugs, dancing, sex, love, death, and, hell yes, skateboards.

General rule of thumb: Scratch a vampire and you'll get bit; nick a skater and you'll spot a thin crimson trickle of alienation, rebellion, and loneliness entangled in and protected by the melancholy, empowering sounds of polyurethane on concrete or steel. Vampires and skateboarders. Desolation angels ... or devils.

When I mention the sense of unwanted solitude and the hunger for emotional connection that pervades her film, Amirpour responds, "Absolutely," before asking, "Were you an only child?"

I tell her yes, I was.

"Yeah, me too. I think there's a real power in [loneliness] for people like us. Some people are able to skirt and avoid it, but I always felt that the power of going off into your own little world is really good. I was always coming up with weird shit, from an early age. I was putting on shows and I had this thing where I believed that there was a troll living in my backyard, behind this one shed. Basically your imagination and your fantasy life just bloom and go crazy and force you to use your brain."

A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night may have as its central character an undead femme fatale with a penchant for truly transgressive pop music and dancing (or skateboarding) in the dark, but there are enough genre conventions exsanguinated in the course of the film to render it profoundly unique. So how did Amirpour come by her love of the moves in the first place?

"I'm an immigrant [from England]," she explains, "and when I came to America I learned how to be an American through movies, music, and pop culture. I really sucked it up and grabbed on to it hardcore. I couldn't get enough, you know? As far as movies, I went through a horror phase for sure, hardcore-intense for about five years when I was around 9 years old. My parents had no idea, they were just, like, 'Go to the movie store and rent movies.' I remember watching, like, Faces of Death and all the horror movies I could watch, and I watched them all the way through. Somewhere around puberty, I guess, I lost interest and now I don't really care for horror films that are, like, straight horror, you know? But I've always been into fantasy. Fairy tale fantasies, that's my thing. I never liked Star Wars and I hate Citizen Kane. I hate a lot of stuff that they tell us is important."

Now that the DVD has been released and pirated copies of *A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night* are probably flowing through the capillaries of Iranian society, has there been any blowback from the powers that be?

"Yeah, I know that they've already ripped it and it's getting passed around," Amirpour says. "There was an official statement from, like, somewhere in the government that said this film is, um, horrible."

So, kind of like when the Vatican denounced Rosemary's Baby?

"Right. Well, no. More like they said that I'm a criminal and the film should be avoided at all costs because it's against Iran. It's worse than *Rosemary's Baby*. Anything against God is bad there. Anything that's fun. My aunt is coming from Iran this summer so I'm sure I'll hear about it then."

Last question, then: Why do you make movies?

"I make movies because I get to make my own worlds. The kinds of movies I make, and the kinds of stuff that I've always been doing, before I ever made films, allow me to make my own universes, my own mythology in a way, like when I was a kid and I made up that troll in my backyard.

"It's almost like inventing your own cult. And then you bring people into it who believe. Cult is a scary word, but it is like that. It gives me meaning and sense. It's a bittersweet agony. From the time an idea for a film is born, up until the moment when you're done editing it and the umbilical cord is severed, that whole incubation period gives you complete meaning and clarity. For a short while, it's a universe that you fabricate and that you know all the rules of, and other people are part of it, so you're not lonely anymore. You're connected. It's like a drug in a way because you get to go into this fucking other dimension of your own mind-cave and get it all out. Yeah, man, that was like therapy, right there."

MIKE AGRESTA In our last column, we responded to a letter from Can't Afford to Live Among Digital Yuppies (CATLADY) about Austin's affordability problem. We offered tech-savvy advice for cutting expenses. This week, we're looking at new ways to make money.

Central Texas in the 2010s is a historically good place to get rich. Many are cashing in on the values of their homes – the median home sale price in 78703, for instance, rose by about \$300,000 in the past

year. Others have found ingenious ways to profit from the population boom or the fracking bonanza. The biggest boom of all, however, has been in computing. Every week, a new four-dollar-signs-on-Yelp restaurant seems to pop up somewhere near Downtown. Go inside and ask the clientele what they do for a living, and most will condense a complex job description into a single word: tech.

Our first recommendation, CATLADY, is to come up with a brilliant algorithm, find investors, and quickly take your start-up public for billions of dollars. If that's not in the cards, you might still be able to work the tech boom to your advantage. Here are some tips to stay nimble, make a few bucks on the side, and at least not get washed out of town by the flood of easy tech money:

Try a little hospitality. The best way to strike gold in the sharing economy remains Airbnb. If you own a house or have a good relationship with your landlord, you can make thousands of dollars renting your space, particularly during festival season. But the tourism "sharing economy" doesn't end there. Rent your bike to out-oftowners on Spinlister. Petsit on DogVacay. Sell "experiences" to tourists on Vayable. Lend out your car on Getaround. Sell a home-cooked meal on EatWith. Is your neighborhood suddenly too crowded to park? Rent your driveway by the hour on JustPark – lemons, meet lemonade. (Weirdly, there's no app for lemonade stands ... yet.)

Join the digital service class. You won't get rich running errands for the same tech elite who are running you out of town. But you can supplement your primary income with a second gig that pays out best on evenings and weekends. You know the big names: Uber and Lyft. You might also look into delivery services Favor and Postmates. Expect to take home \$20-25 ridesharing and a bit less than that as a delivery driver. Field Agent lets you be a freelance data miner for market research; TaskRabbit and Fiverr are all-purpose courier services; Instacart focuses just on grocery shopping.

Slackers wanted? If you're dead-set on living the Austin good life job-free, you still have a few options. No, you can't make \$10,000 a month from home, as many comment-thread scams promise. But you might be able to squeeze out \$5 an hour in gift cards taking surveys and user-testing websites. (Google it.) If you're a budding Instagram artiste, sell your photos as stock on Foap. Sell crocheted beer koozies and taxidermied grackles on Etsy. If you're not gonna finish that burrito, you can even now sell your leftovers on LeftoverSwap. How's that for Austin-style disruption? :) **HD**

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


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Alfonso and Thomas and The Dying Girl

Former teenage Texas film buffs unite on homage-filled cancer comedy <u>Me and Earl and the Dying Girl</u>

They both grew up in Texas, but the similarities in their upbringings would seem to end there. Director Alfonso Gomez-Rejon came of age in Eighties Laredo, the child of a transnational family. His parents forbade him to speak English at home so he wouldn't forget his roots, but they also regularly made the 150-mile drive to San Antonio to expose him to theatre and museums. Actor Thomas Mann, on the other hand, grew up in sprawly 2000s Plano, a Dallas suburb famous for its strong public schools. He did some child acting early on – his mother was in advertising – but recalls an all-American youth playing hockey and winning competitions with his school theatre group.

The two might have spoken different languages at home, but both, in their own eras, became obsessive students of the universal awkward-teenager language of movies. Gomez-Rejon recalls borrowing a camera and working with his 10th-grade friends to make a horror film called *Death* ..., *My* Hobby. (He's emphatic that I get the punctuation right.) Two decades later, Mann, too, played adolescent filmmaker, co-directing YouTube parodies, including one of *The Matrix* that featured a friend emerging from a Saran-wrap covered bathtub in his tighty-whities.

How fitting, then, that Gomez-Rejon and Mann should discover each other as collaborators on *Me and Earl and the Dying Girl*, in theatres this Friday, June 26. Mann anchors the film as Greg, a goofball high school senior who whiles away afternoons with his buddy Earl (RJ Cyler) making elaborate spoofs of Criterion-worthy cinema classics. Titles include *Eyes Wide Butt*, 2:48pm Cowboy, and *My Dinner With Andre the Giant*. Their precocious hijinks are interrupted when Greg's mom forces him to befriend Rachel (Olivia Cooke), a classmate who's been diagnosed with leukemia. Against his instincts, Greg is forced to grow up and reconsider his philosophies of

friendship and art, and his position at the center of the world around him.

The film shouldn't work for several reasons. First of all, cancer is famously not the best source material for comedy. Secondly, teen cancer movies currently enjoy a level of cultural prestige just below that of Tyler Perry and Nickelback. Last June, A.O. Scott of *The New York Times* memorably slammed *The Fault in Our Stars*, an oncological tearjerker, as a

"celebration" of "adolescent narcissism" that presented cancer as a gift, blessing its sufferers with a clarified understanding of their own lives and the ability to love more deeply and openly than others. *Me and Earl and the Dying Girl* arrives in similar packaging, this time with a spoonful of indie quirk. Audiences can't be blamed for expecting the Sundance version of the kind of story Scott derided.

Instead, Gomez-Rejon's film acts as a sort of antidote. *Me* and Earl and the Dying Girl studiously avoids a romantic

bond between Greg and Rachel; Gomez-Rejon says that in casting, one of his priorities was to find leads whose chemistry read as firmly platonic. The screenplay also makes adolescent narcissism its subject matter, and not in a celebratory way. Greg is introduced as a clever taxonomist of high school cliques and a film savant obsessed with the highbrow and obscure, but he has a stunted interpersonal life and no mature artistic voice of his own.

It's a difficult balancing act to make Greg both immature and likable, childishly guarded and legitimately funny, an emotional idiot and a coming-of-age hero. The film hinges on Mann's performance. He almost didn't get the part. Despite easy chemistry with Cooke and a good ear for the screenplay's sense of humor, he struggled in auditions with some of the heavier dramatic scenes. "When you're trying to cry, it's like chasing a dog that's running away from you," Mann says of the audition process. "The more you chase it, the harder it is to catch."

It came down to a final round of chemistry reads with Mann and two other competitors for the part of Greg. Mann was asked to read a dramatic monologue he'd been struggling with. "I think he knew and I knew that something was off about it, and this might be his last chance to show that vulnerable side of himself," Gomez-Rejon says, noting that he'd long since been won over by Mann's comedic chops. "He left and he asked me if he could come back, and he came back later that day and he killed it. That's when I knew he had it in him."

Mann expresses gratitude to Gomez-Rejon for giving him a chance to tackle the role despite his initial struggles. "It ended up ultimately working out, because he trusted me," Mann says. "I discovered new parts of myself. This movie really opened me up emotionally. I discovered this new point of empathy that I hadn't really experienced before."

Critics agree. Scott, in his *Times* review, writes that in this anti-cancer-film his "resistance slowly but decisively crumbled, thanks to Mr. Gomez-Rejon's warm, low-key direction and the perceptive, lived-in performances of Mr. Mann" and others.

Mann's experience of growing up in the part mirrors that of his character, who learns to grieve over the course of the movie. For Gomez-Rejon, if anything, the filmmaking process was even more personal. Aside from seeing his teenage self in the loner filmmaker figure of Greg, Gomez-Rejon has dedicated the film to his father, who passed away a few years ago. "The movie offered me an opportunity to make something for him," Gomez-Rejon says. "Greg learns how to make a movie for Rachel, for somebody else, to express his feelings and his appreciation. I was doing the same."

For Mann, that much was clear from the start, which made him even more determined to get the performance right. "For Alfonso, this is a character he's living through,"

Mann says. "This is a vessel for his own grieving process."

It's been especially sweet for both Mann and Gomez-Rejon to share the film's success with their home communities in Texas. For Mann, it was the Dallas International Film Festival, where his acting coach showed up with students to support the star pupil's homecoming. For Gomez-Rejon, it was Sundance, where the film won Grand Jury and Audience awards, not to men-

tion a standing ovation from an audience that included more than a dozen friends and family members from Laredo.

Even a few of the stars of *Death …, My Hobby* showed up to offer support. But this moment was about more than reminiscing about goofy teenage movies or even celebrating the director's personal success. "They came because they all knew my father," Gomez-Rejon says.

The Kids Are All Right

Teen tunnel vision is sweet and funny

Director Alfonso Gomez-Rejon's largehearted Me and Earl and the Dying Girl found a lot of champions at its Sundance premiere – it took home both the Audience Award and the Grand Jury Prize – but his teen indie dramedy has since been met in some corners with a critical loathing nearing defcon Crash; one critic recently called it "appalling," while another proudly declared she flipped it the bird as the credits rolled. Why the pile-on? Much of the hate seems to stem from the film's constricted POV - that of a 17-year-old white guy from the suburbs of Pittsburgh - but it's not like the filmmakers are being coy about the prejudiced perspective. It's literally spelled out in the title: "Me." Does cinema need more stories wherein "me" doesn't automatically mean "white male"? Sure. Absolutely. That's a battle worth fighting. But I wonder why the cultural criterati has designated this particular film their theatre of war.

This film is sweet and frequently very funny. It isn't perfect.

Some of those imperfections - or, more to the point, irritants, such as the twee chapter headings and college-essay framing device - are carryovers from the YA novel, written by Jesse Andrews, who also adapted the novel to screen. Book and film both are narrated exclusively by a teenage bundle of neuroses named Greg

(Mann). He hates his "weird rodent face" and figures the only way to get out of high school alive is to be the semi-invisible guy who is neither friend nor foe to anyone.

Then a distant classmate named Rachel (Cooke) is diagnosed with leukemia, and Greg's mom (Britton) forces him to pay a sympathy call. Greg acts like a dumbass, but he makes Rachel laugh, in a welcome contrast to everybody else's Hallmark-card condolences. So he keeps visiting, and keeps making her

laugh. Eventually, he brings over his best friend Earl (Cyler), only Greg can't even admit Earl is his best friend; he calls him his co-worker, because they make movies together - amateurish parodies of classic films. (Sock monkey and fake mustache ingenuities bearing names like Pooping Tom and Anatomy of a Burger, the spoofs are a fun in-joke for cineastes.)

The first time the film introduces Earl, who is black, Greg mentions via voiceover that Earl comes from a tougher neighborhood and less stable home life than Greg. That's about as far as Greg gets into it. His lens on Rachel's life is just as limited; you can see his brain registering her

Hugh Jackman obsession and the heavy wine pour her distraught mom (Shannon) favors, but those are just two data points from a complex. mostly uncharted well of information about Rachel's rich inner life. The

Me and Earl plays with two of modern film's most egregious stereotypes-slash-shortcuts to a white lead's epiphany: the Magical Negro and the Manic Pixie Dream Girl. But I think that misses the point - which is that the film is faithfully reproducing the tunnel vision of

its 17-year-old protagonist, who is, as was previously established, a dumbass. Yes, the movie is about Greg's journey to becoming a little less of a dumbass, and, ves, Earl and the Dying Girl are instrumental in getting him there. But isn't that what friends are for? Even with their disproportionate screen time, all three young performers give exceptional, rounded performances. We may not see the fullness of their lives, but they make them full-feeling anyway.

ALOFT

So bleak and sad is this film that titling it Aloft might almost be construed as false advertising. The title can't be construed as ironic either because there's nothing resembling humor in this solemnly earnest drama. Although it often intrigues, that's mostly because the film's unconventional narrative structure continually jumps back and forth 20 years in time, forcing us to fill in the intervening gaps with our own conclusions. The effect is not so much confusing as it is baffling. Aloft's characters exude a certain impregnability, and the story's structure only further distances us from them. Writer/director Claudia Llosa, a former Oscar nominee (The Milk of Sorrow) from Peru. offers us a film that's nearly as chilly and austere as its subarctic setting. Jennifer Connelly plays Nana, who, in the story set in the past, lives with her her two young boys and her father-in-law in some unspecified remote area of the frozen north, presumably Canada.

Frosty describes both the landscape and its inhabitants. Nana is a desperate woman: Her youngest boy Gully (Winta McGrath) has an unspecified and fatally untreatable illness, so she has dragged him and his older brother Ivan (Zen McGrath) to a gathering of an itinerant spiritual healer called the Architect (Shimell). Ivan, a budding falconer, brings along the bird, which proves to be an unwelcome pilgrim. Soon after, Nana learns she, too, possesses the gift of healing, but before long, tragedy strikes. Approximately 20 years later, Ivan grows up to be a professional falconer (Murphy) who seems like one of the saddest and loneliest men in his corner of the frozen outback, despite the presence of his wife and child. Jannia Ressmore (Laurent), a journalist (whose French-accented English is not always clearly understood), appears at his door purporting





to be working on a story about falconry, but her motivations are ulterior. Ressmore, Ivan, and a caged falcon are soon heading further north to to find Ivan's long-absent mother who has become a mystical healer heavily insulated from the world by her inner circle.

The film's shifting time periods add a complexity to the story that might be easily mistaken for depth. These characters are all souls at the end of their tethers, and their sadness is enhanced by the film's narrative events, inhospitable landscape, and the filmmaker's flat, close-up visual strategies that prevent us from embracing these cheerless creatures. All seek answers that are beyond their comprehension. It's as if Llosa wants us to walk in their shoes, but neglected to provide a destination. ★↓ – Marjorie Baumgarten

It's the big itch, inevitable in the course of any relationship. It usually starts in the seventh year, give or take a year or two. But no matter when it happens, the operative questions remain the same: whether - and how to scratch it. In the tepid Generation X comedy The Overnight, two straight couples spend 12 or so hours asking themselves those things during a long night's journey into day that involves a little skinny-dipping, a lot of champagne swilling, and the possibility of ratcheting it up, sex-wise. It's an Albee all-night free-for-all for four thirtysomethings gingerly considering pushing the boundaries of their marriages, but without the vitriolic relish of their hallowed predecessors, George and Martha and Nick and Honey. No matter how hard the film tries to challenge bourgeois notions of wedded bliss, it's all so very civilized. There are no outbursts of "Hey, Swampy!" No revelations of makebelieve offspring. For those of you who like a swift kick in their epiphanies, you may ask: What's the fun in that?

No question, *The Overnight* makes some perceptive observations about the inexorable wane of physical attraction that every relationship experiences at some point. It aptly traverses a rocky terrain with which many of us are painfully familiar. (The opening scene is spot-on: A couple intentionally engages in coitus interruptus to individually bring themselves to orgasm simply because it's become the most efficient way to end the sex act.) Director/screenwriter Brice's script runs the gamut from penis envy of the non-Freudian male variety to anonymous ierk-off sex in a massage parlor, with a detour into anal art, depicting assholes as flowery supernovas. These diversions, however, are more silly than shocking. The actors are game for anything, refreshingly so, especially Scott as the homebound househusband who finds himself open to something different. Kudos to both Scott and Schwartzman for wearing the bro version

of a merkin in the nighttime pool scenes. going so far as to gyrate like spastic strippers in a third-rate version of Magic Mike. It's a move that definitely took (fake) balls. The two female leads (the wonderful Schilling from Orange Is the New Black) and Godrèche don't fare as well; they come off as bland and interchangeable, afraid to push the same kinds of limits as their male counterparts. In the end, the preordained ménage à quatre that culminates the evening's funny games titillates neither mentally nor erotically. Without any such catharsis, the whole thing feels like a big tease. No doubt what The Overnight could use at this point is another happy ending. ** - Steve Davis ALAMO SOUTH LAMAR, ARBOR

For a sequel no one really asked for, *Ted* 2 delivers the profane, politically incorrect, comedy fool's gold better than you'd expect. Hankering to see Marky Mark and the furry bunch covered in gallons of black men's semen? You'll either laugh out loud or gag – okay, both – at *Family Guy* and *American Dad* creator MacFarlane's icky, sticky *bukkake* riffage. Are you dying to see *Star Trek: The Next Generation*'s Michael Dorn attend Comic-Con costumed as his Klingon character Worf? Yuks aplenty for you here. And then there's Ted, the living teddy bear (voiced by MacFarlane), who continues to wake 'n' bake with his best bro

John (Wahlberg) in between marital spats with his hottie human wife Tami-Lynn (Barth). What's different this time out? *Ted 2*, it turns out, is very much of the moment.

Coincidentally or not, Ted 2 revolves around issues of civil rights, interspecies relations (slyly subbing for puritanical America's boiling LGBT and racial divisions), and what, exactly, defines personhood. When teddy bear Ted and human Tami-Lynn decide to have a baby to save their faltering marriage with the support of BBF John, the trio runs afoul of practical physiological matters - Ted isn't exactly anatomically correct - and the court system. Attempts at getting a sperm donor raise certain governmental red flags, and Ted is declared to be not a person at all, but, indeed, property. Enter, weirdly, predictably, Morgan Freeman. But before that, enter John's emergent love interest, fledgling attorney Samantha (a very game Seyfried). Armed with volumes of legal texts ranging from the Dred Scott case to the Scopes monkey trial, Samantha aims to prove that this foul-mouthed little bundle of horny, ganja-loving, Beantown bombast is more human than he looks. The outcome is no great surprise, and plenty of the gags feel as though they were meant to be throwaways, but Ted 2, exactly like its predecessor, has plenty of heart, which makes all the rest of the black-dick jokes marginally more tolerable. (As an added bonus, you get Morgan Freeman telling the audience he's going to "go fuck myself now." It's difficult to top that.)

My respect for MacFarlane doubled (at least) when he signed on to executive-pro-



duce the reboot of Carl Sagan's groundbreaking PBS series *Cosmos*, this time hosted by the ultra-personable astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson. MacFarlane's skepticalhumanist allegiances have long been a subversive staple on his admirably deranged animated series, but taking science to the masses via the Fox network was a wicked*smaht* coup that would have made even Sagan chuckle.

That same stream of cultural bravery pops up all over the place in *Ted 2*, so kudos to MacFarlane for keeping a certain thread of sanity alive in a milieu that concurrently demands willing suspension of disbelief. *Ted* 2 isn't the stony-but-quick-witted revelation that *Ted* was, but it's close enough to make you want to smoke a fatty and hit the theatre. $\star \star$ – *Marc Sayloy*

EX MACHINA

The directorial debut from screenwriter Alex Garland (28 Days Later), Ex Machina seems to catch a high fever around its climax - when the plot goes nutso, along with Garland's control of the narrative - but what comes before is a cold-sweated chamber piece about human error and techno-terror. At an Internet megacorporation, low-level programmer Caleb (Gleeson) wins a companywide lottery to spend a week with reclusive CEO Nathan (Isaac), who soon reveals the true purpose of the visit: Caleb will be the first outsider to interact with Ava (Vikander), a humanscaled artificial intelligence built by Nathan. Garland's film is no timid nibble of the ethics surrounding sentient robots; it's alert to the urgency of this very plausible future technology, and wickedly creepy, too. But his conclusions don't feel 100% chewed through. A rattling and ruminative piece of speculative fiction, Ex Machina is good enough to wish it were even better. (04/17/2015)

Bathsheba is wooed and pursued over the course of Thomas Vinterberg's fashionable film by three very different admirers: honorable sheep farmer Gabriel Oak (Schoenaerts); wealthy landowner William Boldwood (Sheen); and Sergeant Troy (Sturridge), a nattily

mustached officer who wields a very sexy saber. Decorous, deferential to landscapes and lamp lighting, but ultimately more efficient than it is soul-stirring, this adaptation is a complement of its time: Bathsheba has been reborn as a matter-of-fact feminist heroine, and her three bachelors are just no match for her. 



There's much to applaud and much to knock in this Disney action adventure. What Brad Bird's Tomorrowland does well, it does very well; what it doesn't adds to the sense of a jumbled story and unremitting manifesto of hope aimed at young and old alike. Britt Robertson and Raffey Cassidy are terrific as the story's primary protagonists: Casey Newton (Robertson), a girl in her late teens, and adolescent robot Athena (Cassidy), a mysterious emissary from the titular Tomorrowland. That these two manage to steal the limelight from George Cloonev's grizzled Frank Walker and Hugh Laurie's misguided baddie is no small accomplishment. Tomorrowland breaks the mold to become something quite original and complex, encouraging viewers to dream and imagine without making these suggestions explicit. The film leaves nothing to chance, however, and as a result, seems more like a calculation than a flight of fancy. Still, many of its calculations add up. WHEN MARNIE WAS THERE

Say it isn't so. Studio Ghibli! Scuttlebutt has it that this clever, albeit notably less than thrilling, adaptation of Brit author Joan G. Robinson's 1967 YA novel may be the final feature release from the storied Japanese animation powerhouse - not surprising, following iconic studio figurehead Hayao Miyazaki's retirement in 2013, but still a loss to Japanimation fans and lovers of rich, passionate cinema the world over. When Marnie's tomboyish protagonist Anna is sent by her foster "auntie" to the rural marshlands of Hokkaido, her full, tragic backstory begins to emerge - thanks to the titular young blond girl who only seems to appear when Anna dozes off. Shot in a lovely, Ghibli-esque style, but suffering from dreadfully slow pacing and a "shocking" final revelation that will only surprise audience members under the age of one, When Marnie Was There is, disappointingly, a long way from being a Studio Ghibli classic. It's best to leave behind any preconceptions you may have regarding nature vs. nurture before watching this thought-provoking, almost painfully intimate documentary. The wolfpack of the title refers to the Angulo brothers, a sextet of siblings who have been raised by their parents



in near-permanent isolation within the stark confines of a public housing apartment on New York's Lower East Side. Intercutting footage of the extremely personable, wildly imaginative brothers – who, ranging in age from 11 to 18 years old, seem impossibly normal given their bizarre circumstances – with interviews with their conflicted mother and shamanistic, abusive, Peruvian father, Moselle's film begs as many questions as it answers. One thing is clear, however, by the time this pack of pups is seen approaching the Atlantic Ocean for the very first time: that there are second acts, and more, in American lives – even ones so borderline freakish as those presented here. Holy Mountain Closing Oct. 1

Leases are time bombs in Austin's increasingly exorbitant real estate market. As the contract ticks down, rent hikes turn meteoric, and if the renter can't compensate ... *Kaboom!*

So goes the fate of Seventh Street venue **Holy Mountain**, which will expire with its lease on October 1. Casualties of the pricing boom, owners were confronted with a 45% rent increase, putting their monthly bill at \$8,000 plus "triple net" fees – taxes, insurance, and maintenance – totaling in the thousands. It's an unmanageable figure for the club to sustain, confirms co-owner **James Taylor**.

A small room with big ambitions, Holy Mountain opened on New Year's Eve 2012 in the revamped shell of erstwhile hipster chain **Beauty Bar**. Under the ownership of Taylor and **Jared Cannon**, **Bart Butler**, **Niraj Mehdiratta**, **Ryan Cano**, and **Aaron Berkowitz**, the 200-capacity club made all the right moves to remain relevant: nurturing homegrown acts, hosting rising (inter)nationals (like **Kate Tempest**'s recent sellout), and participating in festivals including **South by Southwest**, **Chaos in Tejas**, **Fun Fun Fun**, and **Weird City Hip-Hop**. They also became models of community involvement, with Taylor spearheading **Red River Cultural District** initiatives.

Yet good citizenship counts for little in this seller's market, where top dollar trumps culture. Holy Mountain took over a five-year contract inked by Beauty Bar in 2010, and Taylor says that, until April, they were optimistic about re-signing. The partners tried negotiating an extension with landlord **Jim Daywood** to no avail.

"I'm not going to walk away from the terms of the lease thinking that those three years were wasted," says Taylor. "The landlord can take away the property, but he can't take away the time **Mos Def** played at Holy Mountain, or the time half of the **Neville Brothers** played with **Ivan Neville**'s **Dumpstaphunk**, or when the **Cro-Mags** stood onstage and talked about how important DIY all-ages hardcore venues are.

"All of us got into this because we came from booking shows, throwing parties, or being in bands," he continues. "If we're going out, we're going out doing the best damn shows possible."

Taylor's filling Holy Mountain's September calendar with old favorites and bucket-list acquisitions. They'll host a weekly "Super Secret Special Guest Series" on Mondays, bringing in mega-artists for underplays announced on the day of the show. Beyond marquee bookings such as **Lætitia Sadier** of **Stereolab** (9/17), familial locals will soundtrack Armageddon: **Hard Proof, Not in the Face, Feral Future, East Cameron Folkcore, Harvest Thieves, Ben Ballinger,** and **Mike & the Moonpies**, who'll be the last band to play Holy Mountain.

The issue of venues struggling to survive overvalued rents remains a citywide concern. An active example exists next door to Holy Mountain, where Red 7 is currently in negotiations with the same landlord, who's seeking to raise the monthly payment from \$9,000 to \$14,000. Red 7 partner Jared Cannon tells "Playback" they're working to re-sign their lease, which also ends September 30, but haven't secured a contract.

Meanwhile, prospective tenants have toured the building at 617 E. Seventh Street. A restaurant's already looked at the space, but the notable potential lessee is a consortium of well-known club owners and higher-ups at a local concert promotions company. A new music venue would help sustain Red River's vaunted culture, but one source close to the matter pointed out that it's specious for music community



leaders to ignore Holy Mountain's initial distress signal and instead seize the opportunity to advance a new venture.

News of Holy Mountain's closing comes at a time when the frustrations of Austin venue owners are boiling over. On Tuesday night, some 25 club operators convened at the **Hole in the Wall** for an impromptu summit discussing issues including permitting, encroaching development, and how to effectively represent their concerns to city government. Consensus was clear: unite and fight or continue to be abused.

You now have 98 nights to enjoy Holy Mountain. Make some memories before it joins the annals of bygone venues.

INSTITUTE COOKS TAMALE HOUSE

The Sunday morning breakfast patrons at **Tamale House** couldn't have suspected what the cozy Eastside taqueria would look like that night: thick with smoke-machine fog and packed wall-to-wall with punks – the new breed, with tucked-in T-shirts and ill-fitting strapback hats – all sparking self-injury, nudity, and mayhem.

It was the singular local tour stop for **Institute**, a young Austin post-punk quartet whose wretched insurgence burgeons

nationally with this month's *Catharis* LP, released by Brooklyn tastemaker label **Sacred Bones**. The platter collides a colorfully melodic drive with discordant vocal garble that zaps all righteousness, frustration, and bravado out of punk and replaces it with immense self-hatred.

Singer **Moses Brown** reflects it in his posture. Hunched over like he's taken a kick to the balls and slurring like his tongue's a luxury he doesn't deserve, he takes being pitiful to a level of performance art. "Beat me to a pulp till you can't recognize me!" he wailed in "Admit I'm Shit" as the crowd crashed around to the wrench-tight basslines of **Adam Cahoon** and a woman yanked up her shirt, pulled down her pants, and charged ass-backwards into the pit.

Eventually, Brown collapsed face-first onto hard tile, allowing the crowd to lift him back up, then fell back down again. When the band stopped, he rose, spitting and smiling. His outward misery wasn't a plea for deliverance, just good, clean fun.

SCORPION CHILD STINGS the Belmont



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
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Willie's Reserve

Lukas Nelson parlays his DNA into Something Real

"I started writing cheating songs when I was too young to have any idea what I was writing about – broken hearts and things like that. I just think it was something I already knew, something I had experienced in another lifetime." – Willie Nelson

"I had a song that I wrote when I was 10 called 'You Were It.' Dad liked it so much that he put it on one of his albums, *It Always Will Be.* That's when I knew I had a knack for it, so I kept writing all the time."

We're aboard the Honeysuckle Rose, one of the world's most famous tour buses. The voice being caught on a digital recorder is familiar, soft-spoken and reedy. Given the reference to "dad," the redheaded singer/guitarist seated across the breakfast booth shaking off sleep interrupted for this interview amidst family photos, children's drawings, and a heady herbal aroma *isn't* Austin's most famous and beloved musical ambassador.

Meet Lukas Autry Nelson, 26, Austinborn and Abbott, Texas/Maui-raised eldest son of Willie Nelson and his fourth wife, Annie. Since dropping out of Los Angeles' Loyola Marymount University in 2008, the young troubadour has performed relentlessly with his band, Promise of the Real, which counts a pair of studio full-lengths and an EP centered on his slashing roots guitar and wailing vocals that remind you at every turn whose DNA he carries. Third POTR long-player *Something Real* arrives later this year, and next week debuts *The Monsanto Years*, credited to Neil Young + Promise of the Real, plus its attendant summerlong Rebel Culture tour.

Currently unfolding around the bus, parked in Willie's personal town/ranch of Luck just outside of Austin in Spicewood, is the annual Heartbreaker Banquet, a South by Southwest day party opened to the public for the first time. Across three stages and amidst food trucks and concessions selling all manner of Willie merch including Willie's Reserve, the brand of potent smokeables currently sold in states that have legalized weed, the Nelsons host a mix of family friends (Butch Walker, Angel Olson). the talk of SXSW (Leon Bridges), and familv acts like Lukas' Promise of the Real and younger brother Micah's math-rock outfit, Insects vs. Robots. The siblings cap the night joining their father and aunt Bobbie Nelson onstage in a literal edition of Willie Nelson & Family, delivering a more freewheeling set than papa has likely played in a while.

Needless to say, it's all a long way from "You Were It."

YOU WERE IT

The song's a doozy. It could have come from the elder Nelson's pen. Like cheating songs no child has any business writing, Lukas crafted the kind of sad song and waltz his parent jokes no longer sells:

"You could bring out the worst of everyone you knew/ But no one could ever get the worst out of you/ But now I am fine, all the pain is gone/ I once had a heart, now I have a song."

A sixth-grader wrote that. No wonder Willie gave it a masterful performance on the album. By the time Lukas was 13, he was on the family payroll as a rhythm guitarist on the road again.

"I've been making music my whole life, really," he muses. "I had a dream when I was a really small kid, like 6 years old, that I was on a stage. It was a dream, so there were, like, millions of people. I was superscared and shy, and something told me to shrink down into my chest."

Like cheating songs no child has any business writing, Lukas crafted the kind of sad song and waltz his parent jokes no longer sells.

He tucks his head down.

"And I look out at the crowd. My awareness ... It was as if my eyes were in my heart, looking out through my chest, rather than in my head. So, when I shrunk down, I felt like faith cradled myself into my own heart, looking out. So, I never was afraid. I never had stage fright, after that.

"I was really young when I started singing. Then I began playing guitar. I was really small, but I knew that's what I wanted to do.

"I've had a couple of different people give me guitar lessons over the years. My dad taught me some of the first chords I ever learned, and then a guy named Tom Conway, who's out here now, he taught me some stuff in Maui. Mostly I'm self-taught, just sitting and listening to Hendrix and Stevie Ray. Those are all my heroes, musically: Neil Young, Bob Dylan, all those guys.

"I find myself to be a writer first and a guitar player second. But they complement each other. Performance is some part of that, too.

"I read this book about Muhammad Ali called *King of the World* a long time ago. It talks about how Muhammad would say, "There's so many people out there doing the same thing, trying to make it.' Every champion has an idea of something about himself that gives him an edge over everybody else. For me, that's songwriting.

"Because I don't feel I'm the best guitar player in the world, although I do feel I'm a good guitar player. There's a lotta great guitar players out there, and there's a lot of great performers. I feel with the songwriting, however, that I do have something which will make me memorable through the crowd, so to speak."

FORGET ABOUT GEORGIA

Promise of the Real remains a world-class band. Drummer Anthony Logerfo, Corey McCormick on bass, and percussionist Tato Melgar back a totally wired rock & roll frontman whose grand flying scissor kicks really get audiences going. Lukas Nelson is also a vicious, biting lead guitarist, spraying jagged blue notes across every surface.

Even as ladies stagefront swoon in the presence of the energetic bandleader, the songs connect with their audience. They can't help cheer a song like "The Joint" from second disc *Wasted*:

"I'm going to sit around and smoke my pipe/ And make sure I'm still alive/ I'm gonna smoke my joint all night/ And feel alive."

The tracks he previews from *Something Real* are heavier, more dynamic, evoking late Tulsa groove master J.J. Cale guesting with Led Zeppelin. Convenient, considering Nelson acknowledges Cale's influence, as well as recording Something Real in a manner similar to a Zeppelin classic. Recording in a Victorian mansion owned by a pal, the group put drums and amps in different rooms, capturing a live ambience.

"There's this song called 'Forget About Georgia' that I think is one of my favorites," offers Nelson, cuing it up on his phone. "There was this gal, and her name was Georgia, and we had a thing. Then I had to play music with my dad, and I would think about her every night."

Issuing from the device is gentle stuff, centered around a prominent bass drum and a plucked guitar:

"Well, I sure as hell didn't love her as much when I met her/ Much as I was just captured again and again/ She could turn her eyes away and still hold me under/ Forever beauty and mystery pulled me in/ Whenever she told me her name, I knew I'd die slowly/ I knew I was destined to live with this pain every night/ For each night, I sang with my father trading off/ We cried her name and her memory under the lights/ And each night I pray I forget about Georgia/ 'Cause she'll never love me like I know a love's supposed to be."

"It's kinda like an answer to 'Georgia on My Mind," Nelson smiles, bashfully,

Neil Young's The Monsanto Years reaches stores sooner. Recorded throughout January and February at Oxnard's Teatro studio - the converted Mexican movie theatre where Willie cut his 1998 LP of the same name with producer Daniel Lanois - Lukas describes the experience as "incredible."

"We spent six weeks surfing in the morning. Then we'd get in the studio with Neil. It's the most amazing six weeks ever. We did a live recording - no headphones or anything. We recorded it analog, then [mixed it] straight to digital. It really turned out great."

THE MONSANTO YEARS

When Neil Young conscripts an outside band to work with him, such as Pearl Jam or Booker T. & the MGs, they mostly morph into a substitute Crazy Horse. Moments of The Monsanto Years resemble Young's longserving garage bashers, while others hearken *Harvest*'s country/folk, but Promise of the Real - augmented on disc with Micah Nelson's guitar - retains its distinctive identity throughout. Cuts like the title track wouldn't be out of place on one of their own albums. That's notable considering the songwriting's entirely Young's.

"You've gotta really listen to the lyrics," Nelson urges, suddenly becoming more animated and passionate. "What Neil's addressing is our ability to determine for ourselves what we want to eat. Companies like Monsanto are suing states that are asking to have their food labeled as GMO [genetically modified organisms] or non-GMO. We wouldn't be able to know what was even in our food. If Monsanto becomes a world food supplier - which it already is - then they're going to be able to put whatever in our foods, and not label it.

"Maybe that batch of GMOs is safe, but the pesticides they use on the plants isn't. The things that they put in there, maybe they create another genetic modification, or introduce other chemicals. If these laws are passed, they won't have to tell us what's in the food!

"That, to me, is unacceptable. Because this is the company that created Agent Orange. This is a chemical company, and this chemical company is threatening to have a major hold on at least the American food supply, because their products are banned in a lot of other countries. Regarding whether GMOs are safe or not, many of the studies that say they're safe were funded by Monsanto. A lot of the scientists that have come out and said they're unsafe have been slammed with propaganda by Monsanto.

"There's an employee that came out and said that Monsanto has their own department of propaganda, dedicated to debunking and slamming scientists or anybody that comes out against their company or against GMOs. It's almost like we're being labeled as anti-science when the science is being presented by a company that is for-profit.

"We should at least be able to pick and choose which foods have GMOs and which don't. Because the studies aren't out yet. By the time they are, it could be too late." Lukas Nelson leans back, spent.

"That's what we're fighting for. We're just trying to be a voice for that."



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
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


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SHAMIR Ratchet (XL Recordings)

Not often does one get a glimpse of Sin City that doesn't involve a casino. Shamir Bailey's debut LP, Ratchet, evidences not a single grain of Sinatra swing in its electronic grit. The Las Vegas native cuts fat, luscious beats that tap into a Todd Terje electronic indulgence. As the slow thump of "Vegas" introduces Ratchet in an eerie haze, Bailey's smooth tenor punches above a nuanced build of horns and digital guips. Early single "On the Regular" hyperdrives cowbell, bounce, and no small amount of swag, all of which is continued in a one-two punch with fellow standout "Call It Off." Underneath the kitsch. there's the bizarre experimentation heard on the opener. The deconstructed disco of "Youth" reimagines mirror-ball dance floors into glamorous but off-kilter synth glitch. Bailey pivots again with "In for the Kill," dissonant horns lapsing into a delicious, in-your-face dance floor confessional. In true Vegas fashion, Ratchet gambles at every turn and comes up a major player. ****

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JAMIE XX *In Colour* (XL Recordings)

At the zeitgeist of the indie electronic movement. Jamie Smith goes from the austere black and white of the minimalist London trio whose moniker doubles as his surname to the vivid In Colour of his solo debut. By doing so, the XX's beat chemist goes mainstream. Always one step from total ruin, mysterious producer Burial - perhaps this 26-year-old UK sound manipulator's closest peer in Thaumaturgy – works the damp, muddled edges of sonic

ambiguity. Jamie, meanwhile, operates with precision here: malleable, nuanced, and without discernible subtlety - all between the hours of fashionably late and "Dude, this was the best night ever." Opener "Gosh" provides a moody tip of the cap to the jungle/drum-and-bass culture's heyday, while rejoinder "Sleep Sound" rumples trip-hop and dub. Then, similar to Jamie and the late Gil Scott-Heron's remix project We're New Here, the former starts dropping in vocalists as his featured instrument. On In Colour, that ranges from XX bandmate Romy Madley Croft on the anthemic claps of hit single "Loud Places" and percussive pulse of "SeeSaw" to Young Thug and Popcaan on club banger "I Know There's Gonna Be (Good Times)." On tonality alone, "Good Times" doesn't belong, yet within the album's linear progression, the protagonist has found the object of his affection. Penultimate cut "The Rest Is Noise," moving from chillwave to a neo-Motown commingling of boom-bap and piano, effectively signifies Jamie's last call, the do or die to make that move. By the end of closer "Girl," mission complete. To the hero, the spoils. While the tale and methods of In Colour are wellworn, Jamie XX, like Burial and Four Tet before him, proves himself a master storyteller. ****

IS IT ROLLING, BOB? Bob Johnston's autobiography as told to Louis Black

Producer of Bob Dylan's Blonde on Blonde and Highway 61 Revisited; Simon & Garfunkel's Sounds of Silence; Leonard Cohen's Songs of Love and Hate; Johnny Cash's live breakthroughs at Folsom and San Quentin prisons; and compiler of Willie Nelson's IRS Tapes – to name a few starstudded credits – Bob Johnston deserves a biography. Chronicle Editor Louis Black spent years interviewing Johnston, and reels in a whale of a tale now online only at www.bobjohnstonbook.com. Despite repetitions, misspellings, and Johnston's train of thought not always arriving at its destination, Is It Rolling, Bob? preserves an important piece of music history. Born in Hillsboro, Texas, the subject tried his hand at rockabilly in the late Fifties before ending up in NYC where he started producing

for Kapp Records and eventually made his way into Columbia Records. Johnston claims he merely "turned the machines on" when Dylan recorded some of his most iconic songs, the book's title deriving from Nashville Skyline's "To Be Alone With You," wherein Dylan asks the producer, "Is it rolling, Bob?" Yet, from his early days at Kapp and working with Patti Page - plus the claim that he and his wife wrote more than 20 songs for Elvis Presley (with his spouse getting sole composer credit for "contractual reasons") - to Michael Martin Murphey's "Wildfire," it's clear Johnston was in the right place at the right time with revolutionary ideas.

AMERIPOLITAN by Jim Caligiuri

DWIGHT YOAKAM Second Hand Heart (Warner Bros.)

Something happened when Dwight Yoakam worked with Beck on 2012's 3 Pears. The onetime purveyor of hillbilly honky-tonk rediscovered his inner L.A. Eighties punk and revved his guitars back to where they ring truest. Second Hand Heart, only the lanky country star's second album of original songs since 2005 and his second for Warner Bros. since



2001, continues in that vein. Guitars, energy, and emotions are dialed up in a manner that's unique to Yoakam. The title track, nominally a ballad, contains the slashing riffs he's known for, but there's a lot of jangle to love in "Believe." As has been the singer's habit, he takes a well-known tune and remakes it into something nearly unrecognizable yet still 100% country. This time it's the traditional "Man of Constant Sorrow," ratcheted up along with the rest of the disc. Approaching 60, Dwight Yoakam's become relentless. ★★★↓

EMMYLOU HARRIS & RODNEY CROWELL The Traveling Kind (Nonesuch)

Two of country music's enduring icons won a Grammy for 2013's Old Yellow Moon, their first collaboration. On followup The Traveling Kind, Emmylou Harris and Rodney Crowell sound more at ease with each other, or perhaps it's the songs they attempt this time around,



since they were written together or with top-tier contemporaries Will Jennings, Mary Karr, Larry Klein, and Cory Chisel. The pair's voices mesh smoother now, especially on fervent duet "You Can't Say We Didn't Try." There's also a pronounced country edging present on the gently ambling title track and great Southern funk of "Bring It on Home to Memphis." A cover of Lucinda Williams' "I Just Wanted to See You So Bad" sounds forced, but the pair manages to equal if not surpass Bobby Bare and Rosanne Cash on Crowell's "No Memories Hanging 'Round." The Traveling Kind bests Old Yellow Moon by merging folk ballads, C & W, and a dollop of Texas soul. ★★★★



JASON ISBELL Texas Union Ballroom, June 20

Since quitting the Drive-By Truckers in 2007, Jason Isbell has become one of the best songwriters in Americana today. As the Alabama native noted Saturday night to 1,000 strong at a sold-out Texas Union Ballroom, if it wasn't for his 2013 LP Southeastern, "We wouldn't be here right now." The album's stripped-down sound, largely shedding his band the 400 Unit, served as the focal point for this solo acoustic show, and setup to Isbell's fifth studio release, next month's Something More Than Free. Following local songwriter David Ramirez's opening set, previewing songs from his own upcoming Fables that draws impressive influences from the headliner, Isbell boldly led off the fundraiser for the Cactus Cafe and KUTX with his new title track, a blue-collar anthem in line with past peaks. Older tunes "Tour of Duty" and "Dress Blues," the latter recently covered with a measure of commercial success by the Zac Brown Band, likewise cut with Isbell's empathetic eye as he turned to the slow fallout of a generation at war. "Different Days" burned personal, as did the bar-closing lilt of "Streetlights," the singer winding stories and subtle guitar work throughout. "Goddamn Lonely Love" dug back to Truckers material ahead of "Stockholm," "Alabama Pines," and new tune "Speed Trap Town," while a searing "Cover Me Up" and wrenching "Songs That She Sang in the Shower" launched the Southeastern run of "Relatively Easy," "Live Oak," and stunning "Elephant." Closing with Trucker favorite "Outfit," Isbell noted for Father's Day that, "If you have a dad and he's worth a shit, call him and tell him you love him." Capping the 80-minute set with an encore offering new single "24 Frames" and "Traveling Alone." he closed with Tom Petty's "Even the Losers," an unnecessary cover as Jason Isbell claims his place near the top of the songwriting food chain.

For a third straight year, the annual Austin Chronicle Cookout promises beats, rhymes, good vibes, and grilled grub. Producer Eric Dingus and rapper Dowrong doubled as the faces of Chase Hoffberger's exhaustive overview of the local scene in January. Since then, the former, 20, laced Drake with a beat on If You're Reading This It's Too Late, while the latter, 21, remains a cog in the League of Extraordinary Gz and nephew of late league kingpin Esbe da 6th Street Bully. If the duo represents the new school, SXSW cover boys Country Cousins bridge to the old.

"A lot of these cats out now were in junior high when we came out," remarks K-Paul, one half of the familial rap twosome. "They

were just kids." Alongside rhyme partner and cousin Pimpin Pen, K-Paul has been slanging true-school Texas slab raps for 15 years, during which the duo was mostly known as V.I.P. The pair has faced more than their fair share of adversity, including extended time behind bars, but make up for lost time with the forthcoming Country Kingz mixtape.

"It's either all or nothing with us, but we'll never forget what's going on in our backyard," declares Pen. "Our goal is to make that money and open the door up for Austin - for Texas." Stacking the bill, the Subkulture Patriots

and Mindz of a Different Kind posses trade bars eclectic while Alesia Lani beams soulful rays of "Sunshine." - Thomas Fawcett

WORLD PARTY Stubb's, Friday 26

World Party hasn't released fresh pop since 2000's Dumbing Up, but that isn't stopping the UK institution from embarking on its most extensive stateside tour ever. Welshman, onetime Waterboys multi-instrumentalist, and sole constant Karl Wallinger begins work on a new album later this summer, but in the meantime, his veteran trio of guitar, keyboards, and violin retains indelible Eighties/Nineties hits ("Ship of Fools," "She's the One," "Is It Like Today?") to fall back on. JUDY COLLINS One World Theatre, Friday 26 Judy Collins' covers of "Both Sides.

Now" and "Suzanne" made house-

hold names out of Joni Mitchell and Leonard Cohen. In 1969 alone, the angelic-voiced folk singer recorded the definitive take on Ian & Sylvia's "Someday Soon," inspired a heartbroken Stephen Stills to write "Suite: Judy Blue Eves," and tried to sing her witness testimony at the Chicago Seven trial. Now 76, Collins still has a knockout vocal presence as evidenced by her 2014 cover of Neil Young's "Helpless" with Rachael Sage. - Greg Beets 7 & 9:30pm.

MANIKIN/ APPLICATORS Beerland. Friday 26/Saturday 27

Throughout 14 years of service, Beerland's been an incubator for Austin underground upstarts who've reciprocated with faithful allegiance. Old and new favorites collide at the no-frills Red River venue's weekend anniversary party, with Friday yielding an ultra-rare performance from veteran no wavers Manikin, explosive punk trio Xetas, high-energy garage bashers Borzoi, and club owner Randall Stockton's Brick Top Blues Band. Saturday headlines lipstick rockers the Applicators, possessed garage mayerick lames Arthur's Manhunt, jangle punks Jonly Bonly, and murder bluesmen Meet Your - Kevin Curtin Death.

GABRIEL & DRESDEN Kingdom, Saturday 27
