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You Always Remember the Dance

You get up too slowly in the morning, in a totally different way. You rarely have to be anywhere early but you never don't have work that you need to be doing. Once you bolted out of bed, raced through a shower and were heading out eight minutes later. No breakfast, not the greatest grooming, the world ahead of you, so much to do.

It's not that you are any less enthused. Maybe a bit more practical as to how much you can get done. Coupled with knowing you will get it done, not even worrying about that. When it used to be you could almost never sleep because every task at hand seemed so impossibly overwhelming. Probably because so many of them were.

Last night listened to Waylon Jennings beyond all reason, and then Little Feat and the Rolling Stones. You realize you almost

never dance around the room alone anymore. Ever. Used to do it every morning to get started and late at night because you couldn't help yourself.

You don't dance anymore, but you could.

You remember discovering the Modern Lovers while living in a one-bedroom that was 90 bucks a month and

you still moved into a giant closet so you could have a roommate, paying even less. Money to purchase books and records beyond all reason. No VHS or DVDs yet. You still hadn't turned the corner on punk so Richard Dorsett had forced a copy of the Beserkley release on you. Steve Swartz was crashing there. Half a duplex on Speedway shared by three people, that must have been a million years ago. Started listening to the album only to fall in love with Jonathan Richman's "Roadrunner." Playing it again and again while wildly dancing around the tiny living room, Swartz waving a cane.

And everything seemed possible. And everything was. Which didn't mean so many things weren't. But you had no idea as to what was going to play out and what wasn't, neither the extraordinary adventures or soul-crushing tragedies awaiting you.

You both just rocked and swayed away that whole afternoon. As you have now danced and sang and smiled and barely listened and sobbed to "Roadrunner" so many times since. Your library boasts a collection of versions, all different. "Roadrunner once, roadrunner twice/ I'm in love with rock & roll and I'll be out all night!" With the Radio On!

The Radio On! You think of the Kim Fowley sessions, first recordings by the Modern Lovers among the later releases. Sure he was a rascal and a scoundrel but it's impossible not to remember Kim Fowley kindly, a towering stilt-walker of a man, who transformed every landscape he inhabited into his own by way of Tim Burton. You think of room service steak dinners while he ran verbal mara-

> thons when he lived at the Driskill. You wonder, you have to wonder, if the story of Kim being a rapist that just surfaced is true. You never spent a second of your time thinking Kim was normal, nobody did. But this is the harshest charge.

What you do remember is watching the Runaways movie, thinking Michael

Shannon was terrific as Fowley but though this was carefully scripted by writers, not one line (and Kim never spoke in sentences) he utters in the movie comes close to the free association, mad verbal beat poetry of Fowley careening around the vast history of popular culture as though citing medieval precedents while delivering a debater's killer closing like Cyrano taunting his antagonists.

Thought of him coming up to me at a closing SXSW barbecue and softball game with three brothers urging them to sing a cappella for me. As they began, I charged away from the just-about-to-be-signed Hanson brothers.

Running faster than I've run in years I'm sure. This morning was water ballet slow; that deliberate, that contemplative. Awkward.

We put out a Chronicle a week ago and the week before that and we'll put out another this week and next week and the

week after.

Jonathan Demme once pitched jazz freak Harvey Pekar on filming his American Splendor comic books by sketching a sequence where a kid would be waiting in line in a supermarket, wearing earphones. The supermarket would be quiet. But coming through the earphones, tearing the top of this kid's head off would be outrageous, loud punk. Which pretty much shut down Demme's chance to helm the adaptation, Harvey told me.

The *Chronicle* has long been in our heads way too loud and unreasonable.

All you are doing now is thinking about the Chronicle again, getting it in your head, behind your eyes, running through your bloodstream, tied to the nervous system as fiercely as ever. Having left the artificial laboratory-birthed Frankenstein monster life you too long led for other lives driven by different energy sources, at this late date you've returned to the beginning.

Dance with the ones who brung you. Richmond, Daniel Johnston, the Kinks, Love, Moby Grape, the Clash, a hundred Austin bands. Then two hundred. And three hundred.

Ed Lowry and you lived together on Hollywood in East Austin the year before starting the Chronicle and then the first year it published. The best and then the worst years of your life, often running together in confused memory with no chronological integrity.

Ondine, Sterling Morrison, Paul Bartel, Kenneth Anger, and Demme passed through that living room with a projector at one end and sheets permanently hung over the windows at the other. You first met Brent Grulke in that house, and he you.

The Chronicle, as much as anywhere, was birthed there. The good year, before the Chronicle, Ed and you got up every morning to "The Adventures of Grandmaster Flash on the Wheels of Steel," the long version on Sugar Hill Records. And you danced like mad. And everything seemed possible. The future was rich and bountiful.

The next year combined Joseph's seven bad years in Egypt into one that saw life as you had come to know it devastated.

But that first year:

"You say, you say, you say, yousay, yousay, yousay/

"Fab Five Freddy told me everybody's fly"

A few weeks back we walked through Harlem with FFF to visit the drug store on Lennox where I worked when I was 12 and 13. It was still there, but I couldn't go in.

Saturday the stoops were packed with everyone getting ready for Saturday Night! Men conking their hair, women straightening theirs. The numbers runners working the streets because everybody played.

Everybody was dancing back then, even in Harlem. Especially in Harlem. And later we danced like crazy through the clubs and apartments and houses of Austin. The parking lots and too-late-night street corners bathed in phony moon tower light. We danced like mad people who believed in everything and expected nothing. None have more hope than the hopeless, few believe more passionately than those who refuse to believe.

This morning I woke up, trailing the dead while getting dressed: Richard Dorsett, Ed Lowry, Paul Bartel, Sterling Morrison, Brent Grulke, Kim Fowley, and Ondine. I didn't dance but thought of dance. Drove to the Chronicle where we have been telling stories and making meaning.

"You say, you say, you say, yousay, yousay, yousay'

And we talked and talked of the stories to tell.

Overly ambitious dreams and unrealistic fantasies are gone. But so are the cheap fears of failure and the stomach-destroying concerns over completion. There is still magic to be made and wonder to be shared.

Awkwardly putting my bad foot into my pants there's a lunatic hint in the corner of my eye. I do a very slow two-step and a twirl. No one notices. Lighter on my feet I wobble across the floor. Maybe I no longer trip the light fantastic but in my head every move is perfect and graceful. To dance is to love again and in love begins all dance. Time passes. You may not remember the steps but you always remember the dance.

NO CITY COUNCIL meeting today (next regular meeting is Oct. 1) – but they're still working up proposed new regs for short-term rentals, focused on "party houses" and a moratorium on new licenses for non-owner-occupied STRs. See "Short-Term Regs Getting Longer ..." p.14.

MASSIVE CUTS IN services provided by the Texas Health and Human Services Commission. to children with dissabilities, scheduled to take effect Oct. 1, have been temporarily blocked by District Judge Tim Sulak. The agency has blamed lawmakers for slashing its budget by \$350 million, forcing it to drop **Medicaid reimbursements** to therapists by up to 25%.

SPEAKING OF THE HHSC, a Travis County jury found its former commission lawyer and former Austin state Rep. Jack Stick guilty of DWI. Democrats are probably finding particular schadenfreude in the fact that Stick used to be a **state and federal** prosecutor.


POLICE CHIEF ART Acevedo signed a declaration of support for Mexican consular identification documents on Monday as part of a federal lawsuit filed in May by four women whose children were denied birth certificates by Texas' health services department. The effort signals his support for the ID card as a valid form of identification throughout the country. He said APD is currently training officers to better identify the authentic forms of the documents.

GOOGLE'S SELF-DRIVING CARS have hit

the streets of Austin. After a couple of months of testing the prototype, the tech company has unleashed its six Lexus RX450h SUVs on city roads. They won't be roaming free, though: With test drivers onboard, the cars come with removable steering wheels and pedals, so drivers can control the vehicles if need be. The future?!

THE SENATE COMMITTEE on Criminal Justice held its first hearing on iail standards and inmate suicides Tuesday. The four-hour meeting, headed by CJC chair Sen. John Whitmire. D-Houston, saw testimony from policy analysts and law enforcement officials on how to better treat inmates who've shown signs of mental illness. Whitmire said the special study came into place as a result of **Sandra Bland**'s high-profile July 13 suicide, but noted that there have been many other cases this year alone.

THE U.S. CONGRESS could be on the verge of shutting down due to the GOP's ideological disdain for women's basic health care. The Republican-dominated House voted 241-187 on Friday to defund Planned Parenthood for one year. It's unlikely they'll win the needed votes from the Senate, so some conservatives are planning to tie the defunding to a larger budget bill which could trigger a shutdown standoff.

Those Who Sow the Wind

REPUBLICAN CAMPAIGN NEXT STAGE OF A RECKLESS POLITICAL PROJECT

Thus far, I've been resisting the impulse to comment on the presidential campaigns. The Chronicle is studiously local in our focus, and in any case the national media

and the state dailies have been beating the celebrity popularity contest to death. There will be ample time to comment on the Democratic candidates – a race now more interesting than seemed likely a few months ago and there the issues, among Hillary Clinton, Bernie Sanders, and a handful of others, are at least truly political

in nature. They can wait for another day.

The same is not true of the Republicans. where the Grand Old Party (an increasingly ironic nickname) has been effectively hijacked by a group of billionaire-financed extremists currently attempting to outdo each other in xenophobia, misogyny, saberrattling, and willful ignorance. Led by a al breathing room for a range of political buffoonish tycoon who got his money the old-fashioned way – he inherited it – the odd lot of remaining wannabes have been

> shamelessly lying and pandering, in hopes of shaving their percentage points of support from that quarter of Americans fearful of strangers, terrified of change, and yearning for pacification at home and abroad. Donald Trump, with his racist tirades, imaginary border walls, and all-purpose braggadocio, speaks to them, certainly -

but Trump's opponents have been distinguished by their attempts to out-Trump each other, a futile but revealing effort. This is the party they have created and led, and Trump's triumph is their shame.

More generally, we are shackled to a "two-party system" that leaves no structurexpression - we can have any politics we want, from A to B. That also means it's impossible to celebrate the GOP's selfdestruction, for they have simultaneously succeeded in dragging the entire political conversation to the right, and gridlocking competent government in the process. As Thomas Mann and Norman Ornstein described in their 2012 book, It's Even Worse Than It Looks, the Republican party "has become an insurgent outlier - ideologically extreme; contemptuous of the inherited social and economic policy regime; scornful of compromise; unpersuaded by conventional understanding of facts, evidence, and science; and dismissive of the legitimacy of its political opposition. When one party moves this far from the center of American politics, it is extremely difficult to enact policies responsive to the country's most pressing challenges."

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NEITHER FAITH NOR SCIENCE

That's where we are: ruled in part by a radical insurgency that, for purely ideological reasons, prefers ignorance to knowledge, power to governance, war to peace. This week's spectacle of Catholic Republicans lecturing Pope Francis on minding his own business is a comic version of the deeper problem, while the Congressional intransigence against any nuclear arms deal – indeed, any negotiation at all – with Iran, is a darker portent, of unilateral militarism without end. And it's been accompanied by an indiscriminate racial hysteria, at home currently directed at all immigrants but especially Hispanics, abroad at all Muslims but especially Arabs. Having sown the winds of war throughout the Middle East, we're now blaming the victims for fleeing the whirlwind.

The adamant refusal to acknowledge climate change - that is, man-made global warming - is a symptom of the same ideological rejection of any politically awkward science, originally in defense of the fossil fuel industry but by now largely detached from any practical foundation. As with "gun rights," the GOP as a whole has not simply abandoned traditional conservatism, for which "conservation" was a root principle, but taken a pass on self-preservation. Captured by their own apocalyptic rhetoric, the party's candidates are now making friends with the apocalypse.

MEANS TO AN END

Finally – not really, but space is limited - is the maliciously dishonest, venomous GOP campaign against Planned Parenthood, culminating in the current attempt to end any federal funding for what is in fact basic, necessary, indispensable health care (and not exclusively for women). Once again, the party and its presidential candidates are pandering to the most extreme elements of its base voters, brazenly lying about PP's work and funding (the ongoing mendacity by Carly Fiorina has been particularly shameless), and using extremists' anti-abortion fantasies as a handy weapon against the idea of government (with Texas Sen. Ted Cruz, desperate to out-demagogue Trump, leading the charge).

In the short term, because there are still some redoubts of reason in Congress and the White House, Cruz and his allies likely will not succeed either in defunding Planned Parenthood altogether, or shutting down the government. But then, neither limited goal is really the object of all this recklessness. The national GOP and many of its state parties have established a permanent culture of extremism, intentionally delegitimizing the very notions of representative democracy and of government, and turning the entire political process into a circus of polarized ideology and winnertake-all domination. The presidential field simply represents the national portrait of that larger project, one that will not end in next spring's primaries - no matter who "wins" - or November of 2016.

RECYCLING, COMPOSTING, FASHION ... AND STRS

It's a busy, busy week (see below), but first, here's some trashy news:

The next phase of Austin's Universal Recycling Ordinance kicks in Oct. 1, requiring recycling programs for commercial properties 25,000 square feet and up, and multifamily properties with 10 or more units. And by Oct. 1, 2016, food service establishments 15,000 square feet or larger will be required to establish organics diversion **programs** – food donation or composting programs, among other options - to ensure that food goes to beneficial use and not to landfills. Starting this week. Austin Resource **Recovery** will host a series of **free training** sessions to help businesses meet city requirements. The first Commercial Recycling Training Sessions are next Wed., Sept. 30, 8:30-9:30am at Marie Callender's Arboretum, 9503 Research, and noon-1pm at Iron Cactus North, 10001 Stonelake Blvd. The sessions

are free, but registration is required: RSVP and learn more at www.austintexas.gov/uro.

In addition, rebates of up to \$1,800 are available to qualifying businesses and properties that establish programs before deadlines or exceed minimum URO requirements: see details at www. aust in texas. gov/zwbiz rebate.П

> code compliance.") Rasmussen was reportedly bumped from the program on Tuesday with apologies from the Code official in charge, who claimed to be unaware of his record.




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Short-Term Regs Getting Longer ... and Longer

COUNCIL SPLIT ON REGULATING TYPE 2 STRS

Based on Tuesday's special-called City Council meeting - which adjourned after about three hours of uncompleted discussion - Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo would like to ban **Type 2** (non-owner-occupied) short-term rentals (STRs) in residential neighborhoods as soon as possible, and Mayor Steve Adler is attempting to find a way to end abusive STR practices without ending the rental category altogether. The final outcome remains in doubt - although Council continues to work on the matter in resolution form, a codified ordinance for eventual approval won't be ready until at least November. In the meantime, Tovo's proposal that a yearlong moratorium on new Type 2 licenses (approved in principle last week) take effect immediately failed to garner majority support.

Adler argued that one purpose of the new regs would be to encourage currently unlicensed STRs to register and comply with city rules, and that argument appeared to carry the day. Likewise, Council rejected a motion to waive the standard Boards and Commissions review of the eventual draft ordinance, instead simply directing staff to bring back the ordinance as soon as possible.

Mayor Steve Adler opened Tuesday morning's meeting with a lengthy statement, proposing a new brace of regulations. They were intended, he said, to "capture 85 percent of the bad conduct we're trying to stop" (e.g., "bad actors" or party houses), and to "allow 85 percent of the good conduct" the city is trying to encourage. He made four proposals: a limit of six "unrelated" persons; a 10- or 12-person cap; a maximum of two people per bedroom plus two others; no "gatherings" of more than six people outside, with no outside activity at all after 10pm.

Whether those proposals are reasonably enforceable - and whether limiting "gatherings" is even constitutional – wasn't settled in the meeting. The mayor's proposals did suggest an attempt to find some more lenient ground, compared to what Tovo proposed, which would effectively ban Type 2 STRs in residential zoning. Her additional proposals (some of which were approved last week) include reducing the 25% cap on Type 3 STRs (non-owner-occupied apartment units or condos) to 3%; that was unresolved, partly for lack of time, although some Council members expressed interest. The remainder of Tovo's proposed amendments (posted on the Council message board) were postponed until the next available zoning meeting, Oct. 5.

Like much of the public, Council is divided on all these questions. Tovo and District 7 Council Member Leslie Pool are allied in strongly opposing what they call "commercial" STRs in residential areas; CMs Don Zimmerman and Ellen Troxclair say Council is overreaching, and should be focusing on the "party houses" that are disrupting particular neighborhoods. The rest of Council appears to be spread between those two positions, with Mayor Adler and CM Sheri Gallo particularly trying to find some

middle ground that is yet to materialize.

As the discussions proceeded, Adler and several other CMs declared at one time or another, in Adler's words: "I'm getting concerned that this isn't cooked enough for us to be doing it on the dais." Nevertheless, they kept adding newly proposed rules, having thus far agreed (although seldom unanimously) to approve:

- · stricter occupancy limits,
- · mandatory inspections of various sorts.
- bans on events like parties or weddings,
- ending the "testing the waters" advertising provision,
- requiring hotel/motel taxes, and

• preventing "clustering" of Type 2 STRs. The proposed one-year moratorium on licensing new Type 2s - at least until staff can take stock of how the new regs are working - is expected to take effect with the eventual ordinance.

Curiously, as CM Ann Kitchen pointed out, the moratorium on licensing new STRs, if it happens, means, "No one else can add to the number, which makes the fact that you have that license that much more valuable." There's already a waiting list in some neighborhoods for new Type 2s - which are capped at 3% of the houses in a given census tract – so it's possible that rental prices on existing STRs will continue to spike. Nobody knows if that will happen. Indeed, nobody seems to know much at all about the best way forward, but that hasn't stopped anyone, on and off the dais, from having extremely strong opinions about what needs to be done.

Everyone does seem to agree that the "party houses" - places rented out to large groups of visitors who proceed to disturb the neighbors' tranquility over long and recurrent weekends - need to be curbed, although how to accomplish that remains a central mystery. "Better enforcement" by the Code Department is the demand, and some of these regs (like a new administrative enforcement procedure) are intended to provide Code "the tools necessary" to corral the bad actors. Zimmerman proposed housing is already prohibitive. STR defenders, like the trade group the Austin Rental Alliance, claim there aren't enough STRs to have affected local housing prices.

The wheels are slowly turning on a new ordinance, but much remains in flux, and it's certain that Council - despite visible impatience on the dais - will be continuing to address the issue in subsequent meetings. Council members repeatedly emphasized that whatever emerges from this week's deliberations is only the next step in a lingering process. And whatever emerges is unlikely to settle the thoroughly polarized public debate.

The Lawyer and the Hitman

Police arrested Texas attorney James N. Walker on Friday, Sept. 18, for trying to hire a hitman for a murder. The potential hitman, who identified himself to police as only "Joshua." is a heroin user who told Austin Police officers that he purchased his smack from Walker (known to Joshua as "Skip") out of a car dealership near Burnet Road and North Loop.

Joshua told APD that he was propositioned by Walker to kill a third party during a drug purchase in early September. On Sept. 17, APD and Joshua connived to conduct a controlled narcotics buy that detectives were recording. An affidavit for an arrest warrant indicates that the two met for a small sale and discussed the potential murder. Walker told Joshua that he'd receive \$1,000 for the killing, in addition to a gun to commit the crime. APD confirmed the validity of the suspected heroin and the identity of the intended victim, and arrested Walker one

Walker, 62, has a track record that includes theft by check in 1993, a DWI in 1996, and drug possession in 2004. He's registered with the State Bar of Texas, though it's unclear if he's actively practicing. He's currently being held at the Travis County Jail Downtown on \$100,000 bond. - Chase Hoffberger



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Closing the HIV Gap

MORE EDUCATION, PREVENTIVE TOOLS NEEDED

"We've let these populations of color down by not targeting disparities," says Austin PrEP Access Project (APAP) Executive Director Ben Walker. African-Americans, who represent around 10% of APAP's client population, made up 21.9% of Travis County's HIV-positive residents in 2012, despite only making up 8.9% of its overall population. (See "The HIV Gap," Sept. 11.)

"The thing about what I've seen – I've been [working with HIV/AIDS clients] for over three years now – a lot of people know they're at risk," continues Walker. "When you're looking at MSM [men having sex with men] in particular, condom use rates" are lower than what's needed. "This is a population that's had incessant condom outreach in the last two decades."

For Walker, sex education is both necessary and currently lacking in Texas. "I did intake for a number of nonprofits for HIV for a long time; some people didn't even know what HIV was, how they got it, and what they need to do to treat it. Our clinic right now has a high percentage of younger people. A quarter of our services [are for] people under 25 – young people, ages 16 to 24."

Austin/Travis County Health & Human Services Director Shannon Jones III says his department has put increased emphasis on education: "We're working through educational programs, outreaching to youth [with] an adolescent health program We're trying to educate them about the importance of responsible sexual behavior so that they won't end up either with HIV, or other infectious diseases that result in [negative impact on] their reproductive health – particularly young women who aren't familiar with the impact that some of these diseases can have on them long-term."

Walker says his clinic sees people who will ask their doctors about using PrEP, a "pre-exposure prophylaxis," or preventative, against HIV, but are told that they need to use condoms instead. (For more about PrEP, see "Season of Risk," May 22.) "We have a culture that doesn't want to talk about sex and thinks [it's a topic] that they want to avoid," explains Walker.

"I've gone to doctors where they even

gloss over a question about sexual activity," he continues. "People come to them saying, 'Doc, I'm not using condoms.' Instead of saying, 'I hear you. You're saying that you know what condoms are. You know how to use them, and you've chosen not to. Here's this other tool that you can use.' They're saying, 'No. You need to start using condoms.' ... If the person is talking about any medication to do with HIV, they send that person to an [infectious disease] spe-

cialist. PrEP [is a] frontline prevention tool. It should be [prescribed by] a family medicine doctor or a general practitioner."

Eradicating the stigma and shame attached to homosexuality, especially among African-American males, would likely help prevent the spread of HIV. Many black churches operate with an implicit "don't ask, don't tell" policy. It's considered an open secret that gays and lesbians participate, and are often in leadership positions, but their sexual orientation is not something freely discussed, for religious reasons. As a primary social base for many of the black community's leaders, the church's collective response to HIV has been slow.

Jones, though, says the city has increasing outreach to church leadership. "We have some contract services that we outreach to those populations, where we go into known areas that have high MSM, black MSM populations, and provide education, condoms, [and] testing. We're working with churches and others to try and outreach to both the female population as well as the male population."

Advocacy groups, such as **Wright House Wellness Center** and **AIDS Services of Austin** (ASA), have one-on-one programming to assist affected populations. ASA's Healthy Relationships program helps HIV-positive clients learn how to talk about their

status with others, and to practice safer sex in order to prevent spreading the disease to their partners. A host of complications lack of education, economic opportunity, and health insurance, as well as limited exposure to HIV/other STI outreach - severely increases low-income groups' likelihood to contract HIV, and African-Americans are more likely to be low-income.

Wright House Executive Director **Leah Graham** says it's a matter of perception:

"When we're trying to talk about our clients' stories and doing fundraising, and we get our case managers and our people that are working with clients down on ground level, [we] find out what are people facing, what's helping, what would help, those sorts of things. I think there are the people who make the rules that don't understand how the rules affect other people. You have the people up here controlling the money, making the rules, and they're not down at ground level."

Lanier High Wins Federal Grant

Extra help is coming to kids in need in North-Central Austin, as the **U.S. Department of Education** has awarded local nonprofit **Austin Voices for Education and Youth** \$2.5 million for a new family support center at **Lanier High School.**

The **Full Service Community Schools** grant – \$500,000 a year for five years – is designed to extend what is called the **community schooling model** into the area just south of **Rundberg Lane**. The basic principle is that, by using school campuses as the hub to provide social services, continuing education, and advice on issues like housing to parents, kids will have fewer home stresses and perform better in school.

Austin Voices already runs family support centers at five AISD campuses (Burnet, Dobie, and Webb middle schools, and LBJ and Reagan high), with a licensed social worker at each center, and the new cash will add Lanier to that list. in addition to providing support at Cook and Wooldridge elementaries, and supplementing the existing Burnet facility. Austin Voices Executive Director Allen Weeks called Lanier "a wonderful school, but it has a lot of struggling families. It's the lowest-income part of the city, with a lot of refugee students, so lots and lots of needs to be met." The grant will help them fill those well-established gaps: "In addition to what AISD already offers, we'll be able to add employment classes, more advanced computer classes, and offer a broader range of [English as a second language] classes."

AISD Trustee **Ann Teich**, whose district covers these campuses, said she was "thrilled with the U.S. Department of Ed. giving us that kind of investment." A Lanier grad herself, she sees the grant complementing the ongoing **Restore Rundberg** initiative and a recent \$330,000 training grant from the **Kellogg Foundation**, both designed to help parents of struggling kids "navigate systems that they may not be familiar with."

As with Teich, the initiative strikes a personal note for **Education Austin** President **Ken Zarifis**. A 12-year teaching veteran of Burnet classrooms, he called the campus "my heart" and the grant "exactly what these kids need," as well as a vote of support for community schools. He said, "We must be doing something good here in Austin. We have defied the reformer's logic that it takes someone from the outside to fix our problems."

So far, lawmakers and policymakers in Texas have been slow to get behind the concept of community schools, so federal and private grants are the lifeblood of such initiatives. Back in 2010, Austin Voices was part of a consortium of nonprofits that unsuccessfully applied for a one-off \$500,000 Federal Promise Neighborhoods Grant (see "Promises, Promises," Aug. 6, 2010) for campuses in the St. John/Coronado Hills area. By contrast, Weeks called Full Service Community Schools "a very sustainable stream of funding. ... It's a healthy amount of money to do good work, but it's not something that, when the five years finishes, you can't find ways to sustain the same level." - Richard Whittaker











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Car2Go Closes Ranks

CONCENTRATES ON HIGHER-DEMAND AREAS

When the distinctive blue-and-white livery of vehicle-sharing service Car2Go arrived in Austin in 2010, they were a novelty. Now they're a regular sight on local roads. But on their fifth anniversary, the firm is revamping its provision, adding more cars while redesigning its service map with extra focus on Downtown commuters.


It's a simple system: A subscriber electronically checks out any of the two-seater cars, drives it where they need to go, and leaves it there for other users to pick up later. Austin had similar services before, but Car2Go came backed by the commercial might of German car company Daimler AG. Originally the location of the firm's test program, Austin is now one of its biggest markets, and home to its North American operations and General Manager James Emery, recently here from Car2Go's office in Calgary, Canada. While that sprawling, mountain-shadowed, oil and cattle city may


not sound like ideal car-sharing territory, he called it "one of our thriving markets, up there with Seattle, Vancouver, and Brooklyn." With 80,000 members compared to Austin's 55,000, it's actually even bigger than Texas' progressive capital. But there are many similarities, especially in who the users are. Half of all clients are under 35, Emery said, "and I think that speaks to the kind of service that we offer, for that multimodal approach for people that don't have a car, want to go carless, or are maybe a onecar family."

In part, Emery sees a generational change, with strong uptake in university areas. In Austin, the firm even adds specific drop-off points for student-friendly events like UT Football, ACL, and SXSW. That makes UT music education student Maddy Braat a perfect customer: A Dallas native, she had a car before moving to Austin, but her parents sold it and bought her a Car2Go

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membership instead. In her freshman year, she depended on her car-owning roommate, but since her sophomore year, she's increasingly used the service to supplement her bus use, especially for one-way trips. She said, "That's the best part, that I can take it anywhere and just leave it without worrying about parking spots." The other big advantage is cost: at around \$2 to \$5 for her average trip, she said, "It's cheaper than car insurance?

However, the downside for Car2Go is that the student population is only in town for around half the year. According to Emery, summer is the lowest season for usage, but that's more because of the weather and vacations than empty campuses. He says the customer base is diverse enough that "even if (students) leave and stop using the service, other people pick up using it." That includes the increasing number of hotel occupants Downtown, since Car2Go's roaming memberships allow users in one city to use cars in any other city.

However, that concentration on certain areas has resulted in a big shake-up. While touting its successes, Car2Go has actually shrunk its service map. This is the second time the map has shifted, having expanded in 2011; yet this new service area is actually smaller than ever before, pulling back within the 2010 boundaries. Drivers can go beyond its borders, but since they can't drop a car off outside the home area, the meter keeps running and the bill keeps rising until they bring it back inside that zone.

Internationally, Car2Go is expanding, with offices in 29 cities in eight countries, and Honolulu and Chongqing, China, scheduled to come online this year. Yet not every market has been successful. For example, in June this year, the firm suspended operations in Eugene, Ore., because of lack of demand. Cars were sitting idle, often used once per day, as compared to five times a day in nearby Portland. Emery says that's been the situation in parts, though not all, of Austin. Total demand has actually

been so high that the fleet just expanded by 100 vehicles, but the fringes of the map haven't been paying their way. At the same time. Emery said, users in the city center were left carless at peak times: "Basically, when they wanted to use us, we weren't there." Moreover, the new map more accurately reflects the environment for which the Car2Go vehicle is designed. He said, "They're engineered for the inner city, for the stop-go, stop-go."

While the redesigned map helps the core, it will be less convenient for many residents at a time when Car2Go, Uber, Lyft, and of course Capital Metro, should make not having a car a real option in more parts of Austin. It's a slow change: Realtor Debbie Barrera said that Austinites are "slaves to our cars, so when you try to use alternative transportation, people go, 'What's that?"" However, with changing demographics, and people moving here from more transit-savvy cities, there's more demand for those alternatives. She's even seen people pick homes because of Car2Go, with one recent customer with a job Downtown moving to the 78702 ZIP code specifically because it's a part of East Austin within that service zone. The question now is whether these redesigned borders will still suit his needs, as the new map becomes a test of how far people will go to find a car.

That pressure could erode the subscriber base, which already faces competition from Uber and Lyft. While Car2Go works directly with the Austin Transportation Department on issues like parking, the rideshare services have had a much more contentious relationship with the city, and they could be primed to take advantage of this reduced service map. However, Emery argued that such firms are less competition for Car2Go, and instead help further erode the appeal of car ownership. He said, "We're all part of this bigger pie of getting people out of vehicles, and the more options they have, the more willing they are to get rid of - Richard Whittaker the car.'

WILL IN-PERSON VISITATION RETURN TO TRAVIS COUNTY JAIL?

Travis County Judge Sarah Eckhardt meets today, Thursday, Sept. 24, with Texas Commission on Jail Standards (TCJS) Executive Director Brandon Wood and representatives from the Travis County Sheriff's Office to discuss whether or not the commission appropriately granted Travis County a grandfather exemption to **HB 549**, the law mandating that county jails

afford inmates two 20-minute inperson visits each week that they're in custody.

The new law went into effect Sept. 1, however 22 counties (with a 23rd undergoing further examination) were granted waivers, because TCJS determined that their jails had "incurred significant design, engineering, or construction costs" to provide inmates with video conferencing technology through Securus Technologies (see "Through a Glass, Darkly,"

Nov. 7, 2014). Locally, 2009's installation in the Travis County Correctional Complex's largest unit - Building 12, which houses roughly 1,300 inmates - and the May 2013 expansion across the remaining housing units - convinced TCJS to issue Travis County such an exception.

However, questions concerning who paid for Del Valle's Securus booths has the state commission reconsidering that exemption. A review of an Oct. 13, 2012, Commissioners Court hearing finds county Information Technology Director Walter LaGrone telling commissioners that Travis County incurred "zero" costs for the 2013 expansion. "Securus is building that technology," LaGrone added. "That's how they're getting compensated by 20 dollars for up to 20 minutes" of inmate conversation - paid for by families and loved ones.

> Travis County Jail Administrator Darren Long said during that same 2012 conversation that video visitation would be "just another option for those that are incarcerated in our facilities" and that "you can still get" in-person visits by traveling to the facility. But that all changed a few months later when the actual expansion rolled out and inmates were no longer afforded in-person visitations. Today, even visi-

tors who travel to Del Valle have to communicate through video conferencing. The change in policy is something that even a few county commissioners didn't realize.

That much became evident during a Sept. 9 budget mark-up meeting in which county commissioners tried to figure out whether or not they wanted to authorize more than \$1 million in spending for something they weren't required by law to do. The exemption means that any efforts to



reconfigure TCCC's visitation policies would have to be voluntary on the commissioners' behalf. Commissioners considered two options – a comprehensive \$1.2 million package that would bring in-person visits to everyone at Del Valle, and another for those in minimum- and medium-security setups costing about \$300,000 less. The Sheriff's Office recommended the comprehensive package, which the commissioners ultimately rejected on a 4-1 vote (with Eckhardt, a vocal opponent of video visitation, voting to support the reimplementation of in-person visits).

"Most of us were surprised that we didn't have the option [for in-person visits in our jails]," offered Precinct 3 Commissioner Gerald Daugherty. "I probably wouldn't have been this moved had I known that it was going to cost us over 1 million dollars. Maybe I could be convinced to try to do something in the middle. Who gets to see somebody? Isn't it true that a high percentage of those incarcerated are there for less than 30 days? I could be moved to, you know - 'You got in trouble. You're only

going to be here for 30 days. You're not going to see somebody for 30 days' - if I'm going to spend what I consider to be a large sum of money." Other commissioners agreed with their Pct. 3 colleague that they'd rather see an amended partial rollout option than spend so much money for a full re-implementation.

Turns out, however, that they may not have the option. On Tuesday, Eckhardt informed the court of today's meeting with the TCJS and sheriff's department. There, she indicated that the funding stream used for Securus' TCCC implementation was "significantly different" from those explained to the TCJS by other counties and that TCJS Executive Director Wood "telegraphed" that he "would like to resolve this quickly."

Should Wood conclude that Travis County does not warrant an exemption, that \$1.2 million expense may not be considered so optional. Eckhardt said she plans to update interested parties when the Commissioners Court meets again on Tuesday, Sept. 29.

Saving the Church Bees

On Tuesday afternoon. Austin "Bee Czar" Walter Schumacher of Central Texas Bee Rescue was set to remove an old, giant beehive from **Salem Lutheran Church** because of a necessary construction remodel. Upon entry of the small building (built in 1951, located just south of the airport), Schumacher found a double-layer surprise.

Turns out, it was actually three massive hives ("a holy trinity") behind the altar, ranging from 15 to 25 years old, housing an estimated 1 million feral honey bees and 200 pounds of honey. And on the opposite wall, a 4-foot, round stained glass window. estimated at nearly 75 years old, features a beehive. "As you're leaving the church, the sunlight projects through that glass and it's this crazy orange-and-blue orb. It's gives you a spiritual feeling, that's for sure. It blew me away," gushes Schumacher.

Honey bee headlines relay the frightening possibility of a bee-less future, thanks to various factors, including neonicotinoids and habitat destruction. Schumacher and CTBR's umbrella organization, the American Honey Bee Protection Agency (AHBPA), work diligently to protect the little pollinators through

public education and no-kill extraction. Schumacher's rescue bees are rehabilitated and moved to new places, like some area schools, where students don bee suits and (with teacher guidance) care for campus apiaries. This weekend Schumacher will build the fence for their ninth partnering school. Pease Elementary, He also advocated for a bill that passed the state Legislature in June, making the Western honey bee Texas' official state pollinator.

Schumacher is hoping for an extra-sweet ending for these old church-dwelling bees. "The bees lived here happily for so long, so we're working with the church to bring them back. We'll tend them on their property and ... the donations for the honey that's extracted from those bees [goes back to the church]. The [pastor] thinks it's a marvelous idea and is going to talk to the congregation. Wouldn't that be cool?"

Who Says America Doesn't Need Unions?

In their ongoing, all-out assault to crush labor unions, corporate forces have fabricated a cultural myth to undermine popular support for labor: Unions, they insist, are no longer needed. They tell us that in today's entrepreneurial economy, workers must compete with each other, not cooperate.

Before swallowing that wad of hornswoggle, let's revisit Flight 1549. As it took off from New York City in 2009, the jet hit a flock of geese, lost all power, and had nowhere to try a crash landing. But Capt. Sully Sullenberger knew what to do: Use the Hudson River as a landing strip! Amazingly, it worked! Dubbed the "Miracle on the Hudson," the lives of all 150 passengers were saved.

But no supernatural powers were at work -Captain Sully himself is not only a member of the Air Line Pilots Association, but also served on that union's national governing committee and was its former safety chair-

man. Indeed, he and the ALPA union have had to fight airline chieftains who keep trying to cut back on the safety training programs that teach crews how to save lives.

Nor was Sully alone in this "miracle." The cool-headed flight attendants who quickly moved 150 nearly-panicked people off the plane were members of the Association of Flight Attendants, another union that trains to avert disasters. The ferry crews that zipped into action, skillfully maneuvering their boats within four inches of the plane's wings to rescue passengers - they're in the **Seafarers International Union**, which gives them the safety courses that enabled them to respond as they did. The cops, firefighters, and air traffic controllers also performed mar-

velously - all union-trained.

The Cambridge, Mass., company AOBiome believes we have dangerously stripped "good bacteria" from our skins via "excessive cleaning" and has introduced for sale "Mother Dirt" spray to add it back. Chemical engineer and co-founder Dave Whitlock told WBZ-TV in September that he personally has "not taken a shower in over 12 years," but instead uses his odorless bacteria-restoring mist twice a day to cover himself with helpful "dirt" that activates the "good" bacteria. The company will soon begin clinical trials to demonstrate whether Mother Dirt (which also comes in shampoo form) can additionally improve certain skin conditions.

Your English Teacher Was Right

In September, Tennessee Attorney General Herbert Slatery concluded that records of an investigation need not be released to the Memphis City Council – because there was no comma. The law requires the records' release "only in compliance with a subpoena or an order of a court." Slatery said if there had been a comma after "subpoena," a council subpoena would get the records, but without the comma, only court subpoenas. And in July, Andrea Cammelleri prevailed on her parking ticket challenge because there was no comma. A West Jefferson, Ohio, ordinance banned parking of any "motor vehicle camper, trailer." A state appeals judge ruled that, with a comma after "vehicle," Cammelleri's truck would have been banned, but without it. only campers and trailers were.

Great Moments in Gerrymandering

In April, the City Council of Columbia, Miss., rigged a specially drawn "Community Improvement District" to pass a sales tax increase. Under the law, if the district had no "residents" to vote, the "election" would be decided by the tax-friendly business owners. However, the council somehow missed that college student Jen Henderson, 23, actually lived there and had registered to vote, meaning the business owners could not vote and that the tax increase would be decided by ... Henderson. (In late August, the council "postponed" the election and at press time were in a quandary, as Henderson said she's against higher taxes.)

Cultural Diversity

While "Deep South" states' courts are notorious for death sentences, the "epicenter" of capital punishment in recent years has shifted to Southern California, according to a September Slate.com analysis. While neither Texas, Georgia, North Carolina, nor Virginia has issued a death sentence this year, Riverside County, Calif., has recorded seven, and since 2010, Riverside and Los Angeles counties have led the nation in death-row assignments. (Ironically, of course, California rarely actually executes anyone; its death row has 748 residents, and no one has walked the last mile since 2006.)

Egypt's notorious corruption apparently reached a new level of victimizing in the summer as Mariam Malak, one of the top-performing high school students in the entire country, not only failed all six of her final exams but received scores of "zero" in each. Her family, and a legion of supporters on social media, have demanded that the prime minister investigate, especially whether another student had paid to acquire Mariam's scores or whether Mariam was failed intentionally because she is of Egypt's Coptic Christian minority.

The Entrepreneurial Spirit

Spike's Tactical of Apopka, Fla., introduced its version of the AR-15 assault rifle this summer "designed to never be used by Muslim terrorists." Laser-etched on one side is a symbol of the Christian Crusades and on the other, language from Psalm 144. Spike's Tactical CEO Angela Register predicted brisk sales: "Men like to accessorize their guns more than women like to accessorize their outfits."

Perspective

Ten vears after Hurricane Katrina left tens of thousands homeless in New Orleans and neighboring Gulf states, many of the 120,000 hastily constructed box-type trailers ordered up - and later condemned for concentrations of carcinogenic formaldehyde – by the Federal Emergency Management Agency are still being used in the U.S., though most living in them have no clue about the risk. The most recent users were oil field workers in North Dakota boomtowns, but shady entrepreneurs had also bought trailers at FEMA auctions and sold them for tornado and flood victims - after removing FEMA's "Not to Be Used for Housing" stickers, according to a major investigation by Grist.org, released in August.

A "News of the Weird" Classic

The New Waterboarding: In April, the district attorney in Vilas County, Wis., announced that he was seeking volunteers for a forensic test to help his case against Douglas Plude, 42, who is scheduled to stand trial (in 2009) for the death of his wife. The volunteers must be female, about 5 feet 8 inches tall and 140 pounds, and will have to stick their heads into a toilet bowl and flush. Plude is charged with drowning his wife in a commode, but his version (which the prosecutor believes improbable) is that his wife committed suicide by flushing herself. (Plude ultimately pleaded guilty to reckless homicide.)

Failure to Keep a Low Profile

1) Maurice Stewart, 22, on the lam since November while wanted for armed robbery in Cleveland, Ohio, was arrested in August when police spotted a man matching his description - notably, his one-of-a-kind tattoo of a semiautomatic rifle just below his right eye. 2) Nearly every courthouse forces visitors to walk through a metal detector after leaving pocket contents (wallets, keys, etc.) in bins. Isaac Phillips, 24, faced several charges from a courthouse visit in August in Cincinnati because, among the items he had to remove from his pocket were a drug scale and a razor blade. After a short chase (and a Tasering), he was arrested.

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very 107 seconds someone is sexuallv assaulted in the U.S., and in Texas, two in five women have survived a rape or sexual assault. Last year nearly 900 sexual assaults were reported to the Austin Police Department and Travis County Sheriff's Office alone, however, both advocates and law enforcement estimate that the high number only represents 10-15% of all rapes that occurred in and around Austin during 2014, suggesting that the number of assaults taking place could be closer to between 6,000 and 9,000.

If those numbers are startling, they should be. Though awareness about sexual assault seems to be spreading, numbers aren't decreasing - or even stagnating. According to SafePlace, the Austin nonprofit that assists those affected by sexual assault and domestic violence, every day an average of two people report being raped here in Austin, a number that closely matches national statistics.

"The sexual assault occurrence rate in Austin is not unusually high," says Assistant Travis County District Attorney Dana Nelson. "What surprises people is that the numbers in general are really high." Nelson, who sat on the SafePlace board for just over six years (her term ended in February), works as the sex crimes liaison for the D.A.'s office. Nelson is responsible for staffing every sexual assault case involving an adult victim. She's also one of six people to present all cases assigned to the 3rd and 4th district courts.

The horrifically high numbers at home and across the nation demand that we look at the bigger picture in order to understand the smaller one. Rape culture – or a "culture that glorifies rape as sexy," as defined by SafePlace Director of Community Advocacy Emily LeBlanc - is intricately tied to mainstream American culture. Depictions of aggressive, nonconsensual sex are all around us (see Game of Thrones for a variety of particularly graphic examples). "It normalizes violence in sex, and it desensitizes everyone," clarifies LeBlanc.

But rape isn't sexy. It's a violent, brutally invasive crime that can rob victims of their sense of self and worth. It's often physically - as well as mentally - damaging, causing the penetrated body parts to rip, tear, and bleed. It can involve broken jaws, black eyes, concussions, unwanted pregnancies, and STDs. For survivors, there's nothing sexy about it.

RAPE CULTURE ATX

Like many cities, Austin can be a breeding ground for sexual assault. With a thriving entertainment district, multiple college campuses, a lively young community, and the never-ending procession of festivals and special events, partying is prioritized.

"We encourage people to come party, but we leave them vulnerable in so many ways," summarizes Lieutenant Gena Curtis with Austin Police Department's Violent Crimes Unit. "We even set up a system to protect our young people with a bus shuttling them to and from campus and Downtown, but on that bus they're so vulnerable. It makes you wonder, how can you have it all? At what point is it too much?"

With school back in session and fall music festivals fast approaching, Curtis' question couldn't be more aptly timed. Festivals - and similar events - combine mass consumption of alcohol with thousands of people, many of whom are from out of town. "It brings in more people – i.e., frequently used - and detected - date rape drug on the market.

However, because alcohol is legal and extremely popular, evidence of its use rarely helps prosecute a predator. Yet that same evidence is a key component in victimblaming. More often than not, rape culture

A Safe Place?

Parties, alcohol, and attitudes are contributing to a high number of sexual assaults in Austin. Law enforcement can't change that dynamic, so they're focusing on what they can - how they treat victims.

more rapists and more victims - crams them into small, usually hot spaces, and then plies them with alcohol," says LeBlanc. "It's ingredients for the perfect storm."

Alcohol-facilitated assaults are by far the most commonly reported attacks at festivals. "Many times it's predators who go to these festivals looking for the vulnerable target - someone who's intoxicated, from out of town, alone, etc.," explains APD Sex Crimes Sergeant Christine Chomout. And of course, the greater concentration of people can lead to a greater concentration of victims. According to Nelson, alcohol - and drugs, but to a much lesser degree - play a large role in the attacks that get reported to law enforcement. In fact, alcohol is the most points its finger at the victim: claiming they drank too much, dressed too slutty, that they did drugs, that they were too young to be out, that sex workers can't by definition be raped, that men by definition can't be raped, that they didn't say no, that they went upstairs when they should have known better, that they got in the car when they should have known better.

"You should be able to be passed out and not get raped," says Nelson, a sentiment echoed by each and every advocate the Chronicle interviewed, including Dolores Laparte-Litton, one of APD's two Sex Crime Victim Services counselors. "If I'm passed out in this room, it does not give anyone the right to rape me," states Laparte-Litton.

Neither SafePlace nor APD had any hard numbers on hand to showing that sexual assault increases at local festivals, and a spokesperson for Austin City Limits Music Festival tells the Chronicle, "There have been no reported sexual assaults to APD during the event, and C3 is not aware of any reports of this nature in ACL's history." However, LeBlanc confirms that, for whatever reason, the past two Octobers have seen a spike in advocacy requests. "The advocates who have been doing this for years anecdotally brace for the influx, which tells me there's something to it," LeBlanc says.

ACL says the festival is focused on prevention: "ACL employs roving patrols of officers throughout the park designed to intercede in incidents before they escalate ... There are more officers employed by ACL inside the park than patrol Sixth Street on a weekend night. There are multiple systems in place to make ACL a safe environment for everyone, including medical areas where intoxicated individuals can be placed and monitored until they can get assistance or be sent home with a sober friend."

Of course, the issue extends far beyond the reach of any festival. There's also the near-nightly procession made by varying states of intoxicated people up and down Sixth Street. According to APD's Curtis, Chomout, and Laparte-Litton, it's all too frequent that the assaults that begin Downtown leave the survivors in the dark. "They wake up somewhere and don't remember what happened," explains Chomout. "Those cases are really hard because oftentimes the person just wants to leave. They don't get an address and don't remember what the [perpetrator] looks like."

"We need to be asking: Why are perpetrators scooping people off the street at 2:30 in the morning?" says Nelson. "They're not intoxicated most of the time, and often they went to Sixth Street at 2am on purpose when they know bars are closing."

SUPPORTING SURVIVORS

Since the majority of APD's Sex Crime Unit's work is responsive (as opposed to preventative), they're now heavily focused on taking a "victim-centered" approach. This entails working from a place that first and foremost supports the person assaulted. While the preferred end-goal for law enforcement is a trial and prosecution for the crime committed, that may not be what helps every victim recover.

"It's important to remember that for rape survivors there's no one answer for how they heal," explains SafePlace Executive Director Melinda Cantu. "We need to hear victims when they say what they need. For law enforcement, a lot of times justice and healing comes in the form of prosecution, but dropping out doesn't make the survivor wrong."

Of course, the lengthy timeline attached to a rape trial and the numerous times survivors are forced to recount the attack don't help. There's currently a five-day window to get a sexual assault forensic exam (SAFE). After that window, physical evidence has been washed (or digested) away. Once a certified sexual assault nurse examiner (SANE) completes the exam - an intense and invasive process for the victim that lasts approximately four hours - the kit is sent to a warehouse in Houston.

Texas law allows assault victims the right to have evidence collected without choosing to report the crime to law enforcement, known as a non-report. Those who choose that route are given an identification number and two years to decide whether they want to make a report using the kit as evidence (the statute of limitations for rape in Texas is 10 years in most cases). After two years, the kit is destroyed. For survivors who report right away, the kit is sent off to be tested. Unfortunately, it takes about 10 to 12 months (sometimes longer) before that testing is done, due to an overwhelming back catalog of rape kits.

At that point, it's up to the D.A. to decide whether or not they can take the case to court. If Nelson and her team do take the case to court, there's another two- to threeyear wait before the trial – proving that *Law* and Order: SVU is one big lie. According to Cantu, only 1% of the 10-15% of reported rapes will go to trial. What's more appalling, however, is that less than 3% of rapists will ever see a jail cell.

A lot of times it's easy to point blame at law enforcement or the prosecution team, but the bigger issue once again returns to rape culture. "The problem with cases not moving is rape culture," says LeBlanc. "We

need to see an increase in prosecution - it's part of my 30-year plan. But it's bigger than the culture in the D.A.'s office. The whole community is good at victim-blaming, and that directly affects juries. They find some reason why the victim can't be themselves or someone they know and love, and that often leads to victim-blaming."

"Twenty years ago the way we talked about rape was much different," says Curtis. "Today the community has changed a great deal." Law enforcement and prosecution "used to be much more focused on the suspect; today we're more victim-centered. Social norms dictate a lot of that change, and we've come a long way. But we have a long way to go. The question is, what are people willing to stand by and accept?"

What's more, the women at SafePlace are insistent that rape has no singular archetype of victim. Numbers show that younger women in college are highly targeted; however, fixating on one "target" group only fuels victim-blaming within a jury pool. Spotlighting a singular victimology causes jurors to latch on to that one ideal while forsaking survivors who fall outside of that definition. This is especially problematic for queer survivors, male survivors, and people of color, because these groups don't fit with the cookie-cutter image of what a "victim" looks like.

While the journey to eliminate victimblaming is a long one, APD is currently

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focusing on one thing they can easily control: how they treat a survivor. More and more, they're switching their victim interview technique to a more sensory-based style referencing Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing therapy, something SafePlace has been advocating for some time now. As a psychotherapy used to treat trauma survivors, EMDR helps unlock memories stored deep inside survivors' brains. This style of interviewing refers to asking questions around the senses: What did it smell like? Was it hot? What did you hear? What did you feel? Instead of: And then what happened?

Because most people's higher-order brain functioning shuts down during traumatic events, memories get stored differently. Hence, asking sensory questions helps trigger the stored memories. It also helps for survivors to be given two full sleep cycles before being interviewed, as sleep gives the brain time to sort out details. LeBlanc recalls one survivor from a year or so ago who couldn't remember what her rapist looked like or where he took her. What she did remember was that she was wet. The rapist's sweat had dripped onto her as she was assaulted.

That key piece of information led law enforcement to test the clothing she'd been wearing during the assault, from which they managed to pull a DNA sample in order to catch the man who raped her.

"Giving power back to the survivor can be a long journey," says Curtis. "And it can be even harder when prosecution is denied. It's also hard for the detectives because they can't stay with every case when there won't be a trial because there's so much turnover."

APD's Sex Crimes Unit currently staffs 13 detectives and two sergeants (including Chomout). On average each detective is actively working on 15 to 25 cases at a given time. That's a constant rotation of anywhere



from 195 to 325 active cases that require investigation and interviews.

Those numbers also don't take into account the non-active cases, nor the numerous reports that the sergeants clear daily because there's no possible follow-up. Approximately 350 cases have been assigned each month for the last quarter. Of course, not all cases are rape, as the Sex Crimes Unit covers over 30 offense codes, including peeping, flashing, and inappropriate photography.

Sex Crimes, like all the rest of APD, has its staffing decisions made by City Council. So whether it's having more officers on Sixth Street, or bringing on a new detective, it must be approved by Council.

In terms of better assisting survivors, Curtis also points out that her units, Sex Crimes and Family Violence, are located far from the center of Austin. The building can be found just south of where MLK turns into 969 – a location that is not easily

accessible without a vehicle, as the closest bus stop is about a mile away on the opposite side of a four-lane highway. A large number of survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence don't have their own transportation and therefore must rely on public transit. While this might not seem like a huge factor, it greatly inhibits walkins from people looking for help. Especially when coming forward is already scary enough, no survivor needs one more factor to not report. "We need a bus stop here," says Curtis, "This location is not victim-centered."

RESPONDING TO RAPE ON CAMPUS

Universities generally have internal systems set up to deal with sexual assault by and of their students. The below list of resources for students is not intended to be an endorsement of the efficacy of any of those systems; for an in-depth look at the University of Texas' efforts, see "Fighting Sexual Assault," May 16, 2014.

University of Texas-Austin

On the books, UT has a no-tolerance policy for "sexual harassment, sexual misconduct or physical abuse, threats of violence, physical assault, or any form of sexual violence, including but not limited to sexual assault, acquaintance rape, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking."

According to a study released Sept. 21 by the Association of American Universities, 18.5% of female undergraduates at UT-Austin reported being a victim of "sexual assault by force or incapacitation" during their enrollment. The university strongly encourages survivors to report the assault to a "responsible employee." That includes administrators, coaches, resident assistants, faculty, and more. UT will respond by conducting an impartial investigation and, "where appropriate, issue remedial measures and/or sanctions."

Students are invited to visit the Title IX Coordinator, as well as the Office of the Dean of Students and Student Emergency Services (SES) for additional information. In fact, SES will help survivors with their options for reporting, as well as accessing, support services. The Title IX Coordinator is also available to accompany a student while they report the assault.

Huston-Tillotson

Huston-Tillotson encourages any students who've experienced sexual violence to contact either a Residence Life staff member, Campus Safety, or other H-T official. Additionally, the school clearly states in their policy that "the use of alcohol or other drugs will not be accepted as an explanation for the actions of any student charged [with assault]." Furthermore, intoxication is listed as a form of "non-consent, nonverbal acts of resistance or rejection."

Campus Safety, the university nurse, and Residence Life are oncall 24/7 to help students with medical assistance, reporting, alternative options, and general support. Huston-Tillotson is prepared to keep all reports confidential, and has even set up the Campus Conduct Hotline for staff who wish to remain anonymous while reporting a witnessed assault.

Consequences for lying or refusing to cooperate with a sexual misconduct investigation include expulsion, suspension, termination, "or any other means necessary to address the behavior." Campus Safety: 512/505-3010

St. Edward's University

Students who've been assaulted at St. Edward's University have the right to decide whether or not they wish to file a police report. Like all rape and assault victims in Austin, students are qualified to receive crime victims' compensation to aid with medical expenses, time off of work, etc.

St. Ed's also features a 12-hour defense course called the Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) System for the cost of \$25. RAD teaches female students and community members (over the age of 12) "realistic self-defense tactics and techniques." According to the description, the class helps raise awareness, and teaches avoidance as well as risk reduction and basic defense training. "This system provides women with the knowledge to make an educated decision about resistance."

Any and all Title IX cases at St. Ed's (sexual assault, rape, etc.) are handled by the Student Affairs division within the Dean of Students Office, as well as supportive campus partners

Response and Resource Team (SARRT) formed, with the primary goal of bettering local response to sexual abuse and assault by ongoing coordination among the agencies who work with the victims. The group, which is still active today, includes members of APD, SafePlace, Austin/Travis County SANEs, Travis County Sheriff's Office, prosecutors, and more.

APD and SafePlace agree that having such an open line of communication between all the branches has helped everyone to better realize their roles and limitations. It's also promoted a greater level of respect. "It's a big deal, and while it's not perfect, it's really good for the survivors, and children [we're work-

ing to serve]," says Cantu.

As one of a few cities that has such a well-oiled response team - to help keep victims from slipping through the cracks - APD gets frequent requests from other police departments asking for advice on building better community partners. "Sexual assault is not one group's issue," explains Chomout, who's

been with APD for 21 years. She joined Sex Crimes in 2013, after begging Curtis to be transferred to the department. "Austin is a very progressive community. Here the police department is holding hands with the D.A. and the nonprofits. We all sit at a table together."

In fact, SafePlace credits Curtis with the recent decision to have all SAFEs conducted on SafePlace's campus, which took effect on May 30. "It's really about coming out of our comfort zones," explains Curtis. "The city of Austin might have been comfortable with the way we were conducting SAFEs [at emergency rooms, with lesser-trained staff], but we were retraumatizing victims in the process." The Eloise House - a four-room facility featuring two exam rooms as well as living room-like reception area - opened its doors on Aug. 13 and is now the location for

all exams done in the Austin area. Within the first five days of opening, 16 SAFEs were conducted, which averages 3.2 rape victims per day.

WHAT'S NEXT?

Austin is not the worst offender when it comes to sexual assault - the disturbing numbers are on par with the national average. Sadly, the sexual assault rates are not part of what makes Austin weird, they're what make Austin normal.

"We're finally at a place where we do a decent job of teaching girls they don't have to be princesses, but we have not yet started teaching boys to not be perpetrators,"

explains LeBlanc, regarding how to evolve away from rape culture. "We have to change the culture fed to young men."

Nelson and Curtis agree. "There needs to be a re-focusing on what perpetrators are doing," says the assistant D.A. "When a predator is in the presence of the victim, they're there watching and staying as their target becomes more

impaired. They're doing nothing to prevent them from being impaired because it serves their purpose. And let's be clear, their purpose is to sexually assault someone, not to have nonconsensual sex."

Sexual assault is a crime that incriminates bystanders as well. "I think folks can sometimes get invested in the group and think that since nobody else is saying anything it must be okay. We know that - more often than not - bystanders do not intervene," says LeBlanc. "If you see something that doesn't seem right, say something or get help. Austinites love our community and we should protect it, which means looking out for each other and letting friends/family/ random guys [or women] at ACL [and other events with alcohol] know that sexual violence isn't okay in any form, be it in objectifying language, groping, or rape."



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


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

For an actor to see a play and say, "I want to do that play" is the most common thing in the world. What's uncommon is for an actor to say, "I want to do that play" and then go on and produce it himself.

That's part of what makes this week's arrival of Freud's Last Session notable. It shows the profound response that actor David Jarrott had to this two-hander by Mark St. Germain. When no one else in town was keen to stage the drama, this veteran of scores of stage shows (All the Way, Peter and the Starcatcher, Ragtime) formed a production company and mounted it on his own. Freud's Last Session runs Sept. 23-Oct. 18, Wed.-Sat.,

A 2011 Wall Street Journal review of the off-Broadway production caught Jarrott's eye at a point when he had a keen interest in a play asking big

questions about spirituality. He had recently completed a four-year intensive seminar course called Education for Ministry at the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd. "It doesn't train you to go into the ministry," he says, "but it does try to broaden your theological view and discern what your particular ministry might be in life. A lot of the questions that we discussed there are questions that everybody thinks about at some time in their life, whether they're a believer or not: Is there a God? And if there is, why is there

suffering? When we're no longer present on the Earth, what happens to us?" So coming across a play in which such questions are discussed by Sigmund Freud and C.S. Lewis felt like divine intervention.

On his next trip to New York, he took in the production of Freud's Last Session at New World Stages and "just fell in love" with it. "It was probably the best straight play that I'd ever seen - as written, as performed, as directed. It's a very dynamic play, and the interplay between the characters is marvelous." Set on the day Britain entered

> World War II, the play has Lewis visiting Freud in the home that friends set up for him after arranging his escape from Nazi Germany. Cancer has all but finished off the 83-year-old psychoanalyst -

he'll be dead in three weeks - but he insists on meeting Lewis to discuss faith. "They're debating each other on all these questions that people struggle with all their lives, and St. Germain handles it so even-handedly," says Jarrott. "The play contains so much historical and factual evidence about both men, so you learn a lot where they are in their life's journey, and yet at the same time, it's very entertaining."

Leaving the play, Jarrott felt an actor's itch to pick up Freud's cigar. "When we mature as actors, sometimes the big, juicy roles are not as plentiful as when we're younger," he says. "You know, I'm fine with being a character actor. I don't need to have my name above the title, but when a role like that comes along - a Willy Loman or a King Lear - that's in your age range" And he was convinced the role would come along, that at least one Austin company would want to produce Freud's here. But when two years passed and it didn't show up on anyone's season, Jarrott wondered if he should just do it himself.

After giving the idea of producing the play a lot of thought that spring, in June he "leapt into the fray," as he told Lisa Scheps on the KOOP radio program Off Stage and On the Air. He obtained the rights – "an amazingly easy process, a lot easier than I thought it was going to be" - with the idea of a run in October, 2014. But then he tried to find a theatre that would be available in four months. "That's not as easy in Austin, Texas, as one might think," he says - his first lesson as a fledgling impresario. He was forced to postpone the run until the fall of 2015, which, he says, "turned out to be a very good thing. Knowing what I know now of the timelines and peoples' schedules, I don't think I could have successfully mounted that play within that short a period."

Since then, Jarrott has learned many more lessons about being a producer. "I've been in this business for 60 years, so it wasn't like I was unaware of what a producer does," he says. "I've just never had to do it." Rights, venues, rehearsal space, budgets, contracts, casting, production teams, PR, ticket sales ... it's a lot. Small wonder that Jarrott says this project has "consumed the last year and a half of my life." And it never lets up. One night after rehearsal, he checked his email to find a friend who needed to exchange tickets for another night. And it was Jarrott who made the swap. The one place, though, where he can let his production responsibilities slide is onstage. As he told Scheps, "We have a little rule that when I walk into the theatre, I'm not the producer. I'm the actor."

And Jarrott the actor has found his part of this project as exhilarating as Jarrott the producer has found his exhausting. He's relished digging into the historical icon with the signature cigar and finding his humanity: "There are some stories that Freud tells in the play that help reveal why he became the atheist that he was, and whether you share his view or not, you can at least understand why he felt that way, why he felt abandoned. And he had a really good sense of humor. [In the play] there are a couple of humorous stories that are told, and the playwright didn't make these up. Freud really told them."



LINE UPON LINE opened its third season at Canopy in uncharacteristically subdued fashion. The program, titled soft, featured five compositions that kept the sound down almost to the level of a whisper. It not only drew greater focus from the percussion trio's Cullen Faulk, Adam Bedell, and Matt Teodori, but also drew the audience forward, into a private place of light tapping and muffled chimes. Despite the fact that his maiden voyage as a producer hasn't yet set sail, Jarrott has already been asked if he'll produce again. He's confident that he will, but ducks the question of what, preferring to focus on this effort and getting through the run. And when the show closes, he's giving a gift to himself: a vacation to England, where, fittingly, he'll pay a visit to the Freud Museum in the home where Freud spent his last days.

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n the midst of a sea of anxious freshmen, she was an island of calm, possessed of an ease that eluded the 100plus 18-year-olds filling the Literature & Philosophy class at St. Edward's University. That's what I recall about Gricelda Silva on first seeing her almost a decade ago. I was one of the new students who felt we were beginning a series of mind-expanding courses that would permanently imprint on us a sense of wonder about the world. She was the longtime teaching assistant for the course's professors, Dr. Cherry and the late Dr. Becker. We freshmen started the semester aspiring to a heightened way of living, one that intimately linked the arts, philosophy, and literature, but then pessimism and the cumulative effects of caffeine addiction. kicked in, and that idealistic spell was broken. After four months, we moved on. But Silva stayed, reliving that class semester after semester as a TA, with the same readings from Gabriel García Márquez, the same recording of Beethoven, on a yearly loop - and yet her sunny perspective on this curious look into the world never dimmed.

And from all appearances, it's shining as brightly now as it did during those undergraduate years, albeit in a new home: the Austin theatre scene. Over the past five years, Silva has steadily developed her craft as a performer, starting with productions at Austin Community College and rising to starring roles at Glass Half Full Theatre and Zach. Her versatile looks and diminutive stature have led to her routinely being cast as a child or the occasional magical sprite. but she moves with precision across the spaces she occupies and commands attention despite her physical size. Her Mexican heritage has also given her the opportunity to speak to two distinct local communities: Latino and Anglo. She's currently at work with the former, reprising the role of Anita in Teatro Vivo's revival of El Nogalar, a contemporary take on Anton Chekhov's The Cherry Orchard that was a hit this summer.

During brunch at Counter Culture in East Austin, Silva excitedly recounts her trip to Connecticut with Austin's Trouble Puppet Theater Company to attend the National Puppetry Festival in August. She's buzzing as she describes all the work she saw and knowledge she absorbed at the weeklong event. In one show, the artists excelled in creating depth of field with their shadow puppets, a skill that Silva and the Trouble Puppet team had been struggling to master. Afterward, Silva introduced herself to the cast and asked if they'd show her around backstage. There she found some DIY rigs consisting of deconstructed ironing boards on wheels with magnets fastening the puppets in place. The rigs' mobility let the puppeteers create depth without having to disassemble sets between scenes. Silva's eves widen, and she throws her hands up in the air as she reveals their secret and blurts out, "It was fucking awesome!" Without so much as a pause, she launches into a plan to incorporate the technology into future productions.

This is the ebb and flow of Silva: insatiable curiosity that resolves into a solution.

She's equal parts pragmatism and whimsy. It's that childlike inquisitiveness (and sometimes superstition) coupled with forceful ambition that brought her to theatre's doorstep in the first place. "It was a dare," Silva says. For her last semester on campus, she and a roommate challenged each other

started studying," she says. "I started watching these movies and tracking actresses that inspired me. I thought, 'Why am I doing this? Why do I care so much?' I showed up to that audition very prepared," Silva laughs. She wasn't cast, so her flirtation with theatre at St. Ed's had a bit of a false start.

Pragmatism and Whimsy

Deconstructing the magic in actress Gricelda Silva

"to try a class that was outside of our comfort zones." Silva, who had left her hometown of Laredo to study criminal justice and psychology but dropped criminal justice in favor of philosophy after taking the aforementioned Literature & Philosophy class, selected Acting for Non-Majors.

Inside the university's Mary Moody Northen Theatre, Silva saw a side of herself unleashed. It excited her so that when she heard the theatre department was holding auditions for Chekhov's *Three Sisters*, she immediately immersed herself in the process. "Here was this thing that I didn't know anything about, an audition, and I just

Still, she felt a nagging urge to continue acting. She remembers Googling "auditions Austin" to see who might be holding casting calls. On seeing that Cambiare Productions was producing a new adaptation of *Orestes*, she says, "I thought to myself, 'I could totally be Iphigenia.' I mean, why not?" She received two callbacks and was asked to read once more – but on a day that Silva had already dedicated to traveling back to Laredo to spend time with family. She insisted that she'd brought everything she could to her two auditions and that there was no way she could make a third but still hoped to be considered. She was not offered

the role. Tormented by self-doubt, Silva questioned both her audition performance and her desire to put family before her art. Even more frustrating for Silva, the role she'd auditioned for was awarded to the same actress who had been cast in *Three Sisters* in the role Silva wanted. "I asked myself, 'Am I not needed here? Because clearly someone can already do this."

As a result, Silva set aside her dramatic aspirations to continue her primary studies. After graduation, she applied for joint Ph.D. programs in both philosophy and psychology – she excelled in both – earning admission into the prestigious program at Tufts.

But when the time came to move to Boston, something felt amiss. "These weird things kept happening," asserts Silva, suddenly becoming serious as she revisits this time in her life. A strange encounter with a potential roommate led to a winding narrative of awkward missteps that tainted her potential move. Silva saw it as a sign to stay in Austin. Just weeks before the start of the semester, she deferred her offer. She set herself back at square one, this time focusing on admission to UC-Berkeley. However, the program required that she learn French, so she enrolled at ACC to take a class. And while there, she found a class titled "Stage Movement," which boasted that it would teach students how to learn in their own bodies. Silva signed up and found herself under the guidance of Tongue & Groove Theatre Artistic Director David Yeakle. "He made everything so fun and inspiring," she says. "I was still learning French. I even made it to French IV! But I found myself [wanting to act] more and more."

The next ACC production was a group of short works titled B-Sides From the A-List. Silva auditioned for a certain role in one piece but noted on her call sheet that she was open to considering other roles and other pieces. She performed for the director Arthur Adair, of whom Silva says, "He's amazing. I learned so much. I'm very glad I know him and that we met." But he put the actors through a rigorous audition process, cutting loose those who couldn't name other characters from the piece or were ill-prepared with lines. Four actors were left for the lead female role, Silva among them, when Adair told the remaining contenders to leave the stage if they wrote on their call sheets that they would take any role. "I was on the verge of tears," says Silva, "I just kept thinking, 'Why? What is this about?' He wanted someone who only wanted this one role and wouldn't accept anything less."

As Silva left the stage, another director, Jodi Jinks, caught up with her and asked if she would consider auditioning for the plays Jinks was staging. She'd seen Silva's earlier auditions and told Silva that she had talent, noting that she possessed a gift in her attention to detail. Silva balked, since she hadn't prepared any other audition material. But Jinks persuaded her to try, asking Silva simply to mime taking a shower, an activity that just happened to be part of Samuel Beckett's "Act Without Words," which was part of *B-Sides*. Jinks cast Silva on the spot and informed her that the pro-

duction would include puppetry from notable local puppeteer Connor Hopkins: Silva was entranced. After B-Sides, Hopkins recruited Silva for Trouble Puppet's adaptation of Frankenstein. While Silva's involvement with puppetry deepened, Yeakle reached out to Silva to ask if she'd be interested in the lead role in his stage version of The Red Balloon. Silva happily accepted.

That was 2010, and the requests for Silva's carefully deliberate and yet effortless talent haven't slowed since. She's kept busy on projects with Tongue & Groove, Trouble Puppet, Vortex Repertory, Teatro Vivo, and Glass Half Full Theatre, among others. Her intricate character studies and boundless commitment to expanding a role's potential have made her a compelling performer. She admits (somewhat bashfully) that she's auditioned "maybe five times total" since her early days at ACC. Her enigmatic reputation precedes her.

And it isn't just artists who have embraced Silva. She was voted Austin's Best Actress in the Chronicle's 2015 "Best of Austin" Readers Poll, where it was noted that "the vivacious performer's impact has left our city smiling and amazed." That follows the 2014 B. Iden Payne Award for Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama for her work in Salvage Vanguard Theater's Pinkolandia, as well as honors from the Austin Critics Table this year for her lead performances in three shows: Changelings, Simple Sundries, and Cenicienta.

Those last two roles are indicative of what may be her most fruitful creative relationship, with Glass Half Full founder and Artistic Director Caroline Reck. Congratulating Silva on her "BOA" win, Reck noted in a Facebook post that she's "had the privilege of directing this little one four times and performing with her three times in the past year alone!" When Reck's pregnancy necessitated that she not perform in Simple Sundries, she invited Silva to take the role. And when Reck was asked to help create Cenicienta, she said she'd do so only if she could make it for Silva. Alluding to future projects, she wrote, "I can't wait for you to make Peter into Petra in Peter and the Wolf and to Quixote your Sancho in 2016. I can't imagine Glass Half Full without you."

Silva recently took an entire month off to regroup, her first break since embarking on her theatrical career five years ago. She retreated to Laredo to spend time with family and, upon returning to Austin, quit her day job to pursue acting full time. When asked what's next, Silva mentions her return to El Nogalar but seems more interested in some potential solo projects. She pauses and says she's still trying to hone her inspiration before she makes any concrete plans. Assuredly, once she finds the spark, there will be no stopping her.

El Nogalar runs through Sept. 27, Thu.-Fri., 8pm; Sat., 2 & 8pm; Sun., 2pm, at the Emma S. Barrientos Mexican American Cultural Center, 600 River. For more information, visit www.teatrovivo.org.

Thinker's Rom-com

Austin Playhouse's *The Real Thing* is just that: a heartfelt, true look at love, trust, and art.

A poorly written play is somewhat salvageable in the hands of a skilled cast and director. Conversely, a less than seasoned team can wreak havoc on even the most brilliant of works. So then, what happens when Austin Playhouse pits a top-notch cast against a renowned wordsmith in top form, each battling for aesthetic supremacy? The short answer is this: Everyone wins.

Tom Stoppard's The Real Thing eschews the traditional fare of absurdist theatre, repurposing it into a thoughtful, self-reflective "thinker's rom-com." Like many of his contemporaries, Stoppard

finds success just outside the defining lines of the Theatre of the Absurd as often as he does within. This Eighties look at the true nature of infidelity and the artistic spirit is no exception. Here, the elements of existential crisis, lack of order, and "endings" find representation in the absolute chaos of love and trust - or lack thereof. Austin theatre veteran David Stahl plays Henry, a playwright reeling from the fear that his hit play House of Cards may be all

the success he has left in him. Stahl owns every moment of a character clearly based on Stoppard himself (complete with a nod to

> "that Sartre play") and exudes beautiful chemistry with his co-stars. Sharing the stage with Stahl is Bernadette Nason, the only genuine Brit of the bunch (though you would never know that, thanks to some sterling dialect

work). As Henry's wife/exwife Charlotte, Nason brings the kind of charm and quiet dignity achievable only by an actor who fully understands the power of subtlety. Samuel Knowlton is delightful, playing characters spurned in

both the play and the meta-play (that will make sense when you see it, trust me). Budding actor Annie, played with grace and glee by Andrea Osborn, moves in to take her place as Henry's lover and muse, and what follows is a jaunt of complexity, passion, and the tedium of attempting a life as both an artist and a "real" person.

As Stoppard's web grows ever tangled, we move from location to location on a set by Mike Toner, beautifully deceitful in its intricate

simplicity. Several rotating walls transform the shape of the stage to fit different interiors, each creating a new floor plan that leaves an audience wondering what form the stage will take next. Although watching the stagehands Tetris the space into new locales is fascinating, it does draw one out of the story a bit - but as soon as Don Day's magnificent lighting comes up, the actors pull us right back in. Legendary costumer Buffy Manners drapes her actors to match their station, most notably removing the wig Osborn dons for the first act in favor of her natural, badass, pixie-esque hair for the second. Also impressive are Aaron Johnson, Marie Rose Fahlgren, and Stephen Mercantel, all playing characters appearing only briefly, but stealing the scenes in which they appear - no small feat, considering the actors from whom they steal.

When a playwright cleverly writes about his own life as a playwright and his clever writing, there is always the danger of spiraling into a self-referential rabbit hole: a Sorkin-esque wet dream, if you will. Even Joel Mercado-See's sound design is a delightful nod to the script itself. Director Don Toner keeps the team from tumbling, though. To revisit the prior analogy of cast vs. script, Toner expertly finds a balance here, nailing the fragile symbiosis between a stellar cast and script. Watching these heavy-hitters sublimely navigate the rapids of Stoppard's text is a remarkable sight. Toner has a well-earned reputation for being among the best at what he does and choosing scripts that serve his strengths as well as his audience. The Real Thing is without a doubt an enjoyable addition to that lexicon.

There isn't a building in sight. Which feels a bit strange for a Blue Lapis Light production, since so much of this aerial performance company's work has involved dancers moving atop, dangling from, and gliding across monumental edifices in the urban core: towering federal buildings, banks, hotels; the Seaholm Intake building; the Long Center; the Bullock: the Intel shell. Here. though, there are no skyscrapers to block our view of the stars, no rooftops from which harnessed dancers may descend, no soaring walls of glass for them to move over. The only man-made structure in this field in far South Austin is a scaffold rising just 25 feet in the air. And when the performers climb

it and perch on its ledges and lean precariously from it, they have no rigging to secure them, no ropes to break a fall. All that holds them in place are their own hands and feet gripping the bars of the scaffolding. For those accustomed to the epic scale and breathtaking aerial artistry of such Blue Lapis Light works as In Light and Requiem, Edge of Grace may seem somehow incomplete.

But this is Artistic Director Sally Jacques returning to her roots, revisiting a kind of work she made in the years before her current company was founded and her dancers began ascending into the heavens in ever more spectacular ways. In those works, the performers



never achieve flight; they may climb above the earth, but they're not able to break its bonds, and our sense of them as forever earthbound gives every grasp of a bar and pull of a body upward, every lean into the open air, every stretch of an arm into the sky a poignance born of vulnerability. We see them not as angels but as humans, struggling against the confining structures of the world. The tiered scaffold, with its bars and compact levels, is suggestive of cells in a prison, and when dancers are spaced throughout it, moving in unison, it calls to mind humanity in lockstep, trapped in routines of its own making. And because we're so close to these performers - close enough to see

their muscles tense and loosen as they grip the bars and hang from them - they feel less like the mythic figures of Blue Lapis Light's grander productions and more like individual mortals seeking escape, seeking comfort, seeking peace. Even though their movements are at times abstract, their faces lacking emotion, their struggle feels personal.

Jacques has made this gesture to her past work to mark the new future of Blue Lapis Light, now that it has acquired its own studio and property, but as is often the case with this artist's work, the present is very evident in it. The restrictiveness of the scaffolding and of two adjacent walls that performers also scale and attempt to get over conjures images of refugees and immigrants who are confronting similar barriers across Furone and the Middle East and our own borders today. Though Jacques never has the movement explicitly reference such issues, the sense of them is in the dance, the spirit of their struggle inhabits it. That seeds

the work with a power that, combined with the intimacy described above, makes this a uniquely compelling work from this company. When, after many sequences in which dancers have interacted only minimally or not at all, the sight of two of them kneeling in an embrace or facing one another across an abyss of space and extending limbs toward one another to make contact, it is deeply consoling. We often associate an edge with danger: a precipice from which we could fall into despair or death. But Blue Lapis Light shows here that such edges are also places where we may fall into another's arms - into refuge, into solace, into grace. - Robert Faires



"I'LL BE IT" Pump Project, 702 Shady www.pumpproject.org Through Sept. 26

Pump Project has long straddled the line between a community arts hub and a contemporary gallery. When former director Debra Broz left in 2013 and Rebecca Marino inherited the space, the new director seemed primed to reinvent the gallery's overall direction and push for innovative growth. While some worried that the forward momentum would detract from the grassroots arts efforts that Pump Project had fostered through the years, others excitedly hoped that a more sophisticated lens could overtake the space.

The latest exhibition, "I'll Be It," initially speaks to that latter audience. The show highlights four local artists: Jade Abner, Michael Muelhaupt, Rachael Starbuck, and Frank Wick. Some employ commercial mediums like vinyl, steel, and concrete. Muelhaupt sculpts hollow couch cushions, adorned with plaster, and transforms them into a ghostly monolith, for example. Much of "I'll Be It" evokes a personal touch – Wick's work stands out for its exploration of bodily forms through both painting and sculpture. The show, overall, attempts to tackle a multitude of conceptual ideologies, like personhood, locality, and objecthood.

These themes register more acutely with contemporary art theory than with general aesthetic appeal – this exhibit slants unabashedly toward the academic.

The glory of art that explores objecthood, however, remains that human interaction is required for the work to be fully embraced. With Starbuck's from the mountain you see the mountain, five cardboard-and-plaster tubes of varying heights decorate one of the gallery's corners. With textured plaster platforms at their bases, each of the white-tipped tubes is meant to be studied from above. Due to the nature of the piece, individual audience members will receive wholly unique views into the work as they scale the viewing platforms. Starbuck invites the work's viewers to consider their own physicality in relation to from the mountain you see the mountain, an invitation that provides new accessibility into an artistic experience that could, under different circumstances, feel alienating. It's that dual mission of Pump Project - to be both publicly accessible and progressive - at work while the curatorial tastes of Marino remain intact.

"I'll Be It" beautifully celebrates the contemporary talent in Austin while facilitating enough audience interaction to entice wary viewers to discover new attitudes and, hopefully, new appreciation for relationally based sculpture.





PURE SPOON'S SEARCH FOR A BETTER BABY FOOD

Alyson Eberle will be the first person to tell you she's not a cook. And she certainly never expected to find herself in the vanguard of the fresh baby-food market. She was just a busy mom who wanted to feed her 5-monthold daughter the best food possible. To her, that meant something that was fresh, organic, and nutritious, with no GMOs, no added sugar, no pre-made purées. "I couldn't find anything like what I wanted in the baby-food aisle," she recalls. "I realized I was going to have to make it for her myself." There was a lot of trial and error involved in developing the techniques and recipes, but "I was bound and determined to get this right," she says emphatically.

Eberle soon realized she wasn't the only parent who wanted quality food for their kids. Every time she talked about the baby food she was making, people invariably wanted to know how they could get some, too - and many didn't have the time or wherewithal to make the baby food themselves. Eberle and husband Greg Godkin recognized a good business opportunity, and Pure Spoon was born. She began by working closely with a pediatric dietitian to make sure her recipes were nutritionally balanced, and she sourced only certified-organic fruits and vegetables - washing, chopping, lightly steaming when necessary, and puréeing them herself. Eberle chose a cool-temperature, high-pressure pasteurization process to ensure optimum nutrition and flavor.

In 2014, she found a commercial kitchen. and her baby food debuted on store shelves about nine months ago, quickly gaining wide distribution. Eberle no longer makes all the products herself, but she still spends time

in the kitchen, and her daughter is now a happy, healthy 5-year-old. Eberle is pleased to report that her products aren't just providing delicious nutrition to the stroller set. "In Houston, stores around the medical center tell me they see lots of chemo patients buying it because they need soft food with plenty of nutrition to keep their strength up. We're in the process of changing our packaging to say 'Pure Spoon Purée' rather than just 'baby food' to reflect that versatility," she says.

For a taste test, my Chronicle colleagues found me a mother/daughter team willing to be guinea pigs. Busy mother Madison Miller is a freelance makeup artist who works on everything from newscasts to independent films. When she began contemplating what she would feed her first child, she was put off by the very same kinds of foods that Eberle had found so unappealing. Miller was especially concerned about starting her daughter out on a diet of processed foods with added sugars. "I wanted to augment breast milk with healthy foods when she was ready, but it's a lot of work," she explains. She jumped at the chance to share Pure Spoon with her 7-month-old daughter, and she could tell immediately that her child was a big fan. "From the time we started adding soft foods to her diet, she's had this little puckering face she makes anytime she tried something new. Even if she'd go ahead and eat it, there was always that face. With these Pure Spoon flavors we've tried, there has been no puckering and she's enthusiastic about eating it all!" Miller says, laughing. What better culinary vocabulary could you ask for?

THE TAKE-OUT BRANDON WATSON

When food scenesters get together, the conversation inevitably turns to gossip. It's usually goodnatured chatter - who's in, who's out, who got together and who broke up - but it has recently lost some of its cheer. Everyone seems to agree that there is something missing from Austin's once-exhilarating dining culture; too many choices, too little to recommend.

As for the reasons, we can fill a larder with conjecture. It's no secret that even some of the most celebrated local kitchens are having trouble finding experienced cooks to work the line. Talented chefs are noticed quickly, but only a few have had a chance to develop a point of view to match their technique. Meanwhile, with few obvious market gaps to plunder, restaurateurs are playing it mostly safe with concept. Many are having trouble articulating what makes them different. Everything is made in-house. Everything is locally sourced. From pasta to bread to ice, everything has its own "program."

It's becoming boring as hell, but I'm not sure that everyday diners - those who aren't seeing the same celery root purées week after week - even notice the growing pains. But surely everyone who eats out in Austin is having much more trouble in deciding where to eat. There are more opinions than ever, and very little of it is measured. Diners go from fever to fever, wanting to participate in the frenzied culture without time to form favorites. One feels like a regular if they ever eat at the same place twice.

That culinary wanderlust is finally taking its toll on our local scene. Although new concepts are invariably filling up the real estate, the casualties are becoming a little more noticeable. Bess Bistro was on my list for a new review, having upgraded their cuisine, but closed before I had the chance to revisit. Mulberry, a place I've spent innumerable brunches attempting to drink rosé from a porrón, shuttered before I ever got the hang of it. Friends in the hospitality industry regularly inform me that their restaurant is hurting, including some very well-known names. Those eateries have one thing in common: No one is really talking about them.

That pains me, but the truth is I am complicit. I have the same tendency to be dazzled by the new without really stopping to consider what is notable. Yes, a food editor ignores restaurant openings at his or her own peril, but maybe it's time for "influencers" (a dubious term if ever there was one) to, well, keep it real. I am guilty of being overheated myself - my first look at Métier was one pom-pom short of a pep rally - but it's time we all take a more critical eye. Austin is a hot property, there's still money, and there's definitely still press. But to become a truly world-class food city, we need to recognize all that is good. And we need to stop making excuses for all that is bad.

A note from Virginia B. Wood: I wanted to take this opportunity to let faithful Food-o-File readers know that both the column and I are taking a hiatus so that I can deal with some medical issues that have long been in need of attention. I hope to be up to telecommuting in a few weeks and back to work before the holidays.





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Trailer Parked

The yin and yang of food trucks and bars

When planning for that oh-so-happy hour where food and drinks intersect at bargain prices, many of us forgo the typical bar-and-grill establishment and instead opt for a bar whose trailer's Instagram has most recently stimulated our hypothalamus. If we've been dreaming of those savory morsels that are the deep-fried beets from East Side King - those spicy shallots, that tangy aïoli! - we might start the night out at Liberty (their happy hour 'til 9pm also buoys that choice). Other times it's the drinks with the draw - the homemade white sangria at Butterfly Bar, for example - and after imbibing for a few hours, we find ourselves grateful that Patrizi's pastas, pulled in-house (in-truck, rather), will soak up some of that liquid before the ride home. The undeniable fact is that the bar/food trailer combo is a tried and true arrangement that serves its mutual patrons well. So for purely educational reasons, we caught up with four young Eastside food trailers and their host bars to see how this symbiotic relationship is working out.

KOGI Q AT THE GRACKLE 1700 E. Sixth, www. twitter.com/kogi_q

Founders Mark Lang and Justin Sass began a kimchi-making endeavor at home for themselves and friends before realizing that they really had something with their product. Their commercial kimchi idea evolved into a full-blown Korean barbecue operation (kogi is Korean for "meat"). Before launching their trailer, Sass worked for the Uchi family while Lang was a part of the Home Slice crew. A mutual friend brought then-bar manager of the Grackle (now-owner Tim Murphy) a bowl of kimchi soup that Lang had made. Later on, Murphy called his buddy, a manager at Home Slice, saying their bar was looking for a food truck to co-habitate.

"Just like anything in this town," says Lang, "you have to know somebody." At this point, Murphy had heard Lang's name more than once, and the wheels were set in motion.

"We definitely wanted to be at a bar from the beginning," says Sass. "Feeding people when they're drinking? That's like a public

safety." They appropriately tailored their menu to include bulgogi, kimchi fried rice, japchae sweet potato noodles, and the Kogi kogo, a french-fry corn dog – one of the hottest things in Korean street food right now. "It's the most American thing to come out of Korea." laughs Lang. Tacos were eventually added, after confused customers repeatedly asked, "Where's your taco?" This is Austin, after all. Sass reiterates that they're there for the people, and with a little flexibility, have catered to what the people want. "This is a better concept for doing bar food," says Lang.

The trailer's menus are also scattered on the tables at new neighbor Zilker Brewery, whose garden supplies the lime basil

for Kogi Q's squash salad. "We get call-in orders from them," says Sass. Families or high school students who can't get past Liberty's doorman for those aforementioned beet fries are referred to Kogi Q, which sits in the Grackle's front parking lot. "It's a great relationship we have with all the businesses," says Sass.

ARLO'S AT DRINKS LOUNGE 2001 E. Cesar Chavez, www. arlostruck.com

Arlo's began slinging their vegan Bac'n Cheeze Burgers and Chik'n Tacos behind Hotel Vegas in 2011. After moving a few blocks down to Cheer Up Charlies, and then following them to their current Red River digs, Arlo's launched their second truck this year, initially parking at South Austin's Radio Coffee & Beer. Radio, which serves a large, early morning crowd, wanted something a

little different than vegan comfort food, and Arlo's owner Christopher Baker acknowledges their meals aren't exactly breakfast fare. Their newest truck was on the move.

Arlo's general manager lan Walling (and drummer for Riverboat Gamblers) answered Drinks owner Tim Lupa's call on social media for a food truck to operate out of the lounge's back alley. Drinks has always had a kitchen space in their building, but Lupa estimates it could cost up to \$20,000 to convert it into a working kitchen. "I talked to friends of mine who own bars with kitchens, and they said that over here, I'm just gonna lose money," says Lupa. "They only break even on food, and it's just to get people in the door." In a neighborhood area without much foot traffic, Lupa decided the investment wasn't worth it. However, Lupa, who also owns the Brixton, knows the importance of a nearby food supply for his drinkers.



Baker says that future expansion of the Arlo's fleet will always involve a partnership with a drinking establishment. Regarding food trailer parks, those corrals of anywhere from three to 10 different cuisines, he says, "There are so many of them, and when you come in, there's so much to choose from. I don't know how you survive in that environment." Arlo's is more than content to live behind Drinks, even though no part of the trailer is visible from the bar or the street. Regulars and word-of-mouth seem to be enough for this location. "If things continue to go this well," says Baker, "we'll consider building a kitchen on the inside and cut a window where people on the outside can order." Arlo's moved into Drinks in August, and already the two businesses are discussing long-term arrangements, a sign that this relationship is not only working out, but flourishing.

LADY LUCK AT THE HARD LUCK LOUNGE 3526 E. Seventh, www.fb.com/ ladvlucktrailer

The Hard Luck Lounge is White Horse coowner and former Hole in the Wall manager Denis O'Donnell's latest venture, taking up residence on far-East Seventh Street. "We opened a bar that is not in an entertainment district." O'Donnell explains, "and our food has to grab the customer hard enough to make them want to come back." Enter Lady Luck, the breadbakin', beef-brinin', seitan-smokin' operation run by Lynzy Moran and Virginia Pharr, both veterans of the food truck biz. They describe this menu as "international classics with a Southern perspective - kinda," and sourcing local veggies from Johnson's Backyard Garden

and Springdale Farm means it's always rotating. "Our regulars are excited that there's always something new," says Moran.

Being off the beaten path, Moran and Pharr know that social media is paramount in spreading the word about their food. Enticing photos are regularly posted on Facebook, showcasing elaborate dishes like crispy eggplant with smoked tomatillo/avocado/grapefruit salsa and vegan chile cream sauce; or buttermilk-brined, spicy fried chicken served with potato salad; maybe the smoked pulledpork tacos with pickled watermelon rind; or the O'Donnell Sando, 10-day brined beef on a kummelweck caraway bun. The extensive menu ensures that when large groups or families visit the spacious patio, there's usually something that appeals to everyone.

O'Donnell's other watering holes have always partnered with independently run food outfits. When asked if having a food component was deemed crucial to the Hard Luck Lounge's success, O'Donnell proudly claims, "Lady Luck has proven to be an invaluable part of our operation." TABC laws require that any purchase of an alcoholic beverage before noon on Sunday be accompanied by the sale of food. (Thou shalt not show up to church with a buzz.) The fact that Lady Luck serves brunch on Sundays - a proper-as-hell brunch, at that - means that the Hard Luck Lounge is able to extend its hours and start selling booze when Lady Luck opens at 11am, which O'Donnell confirms they will do soon.



TOASTER AT STAY GOLD

Former McGuire Moorman pastry chef Hannah Love's shiny, curvy Airstream International trailer sits in Stay Gold's courtyard, serving home-style meals "just like your mamma made" to patrons of the soul/funk/blues venue. Stay Gold owners Nathan Hill (the White Horse) and Will Tanner (Hole in the Wall), old friends of Love's, gave her free rein when it came to designing the food truck's concept. Her pulled pork crunchy tacos are one of her favorite meals to make at home, so she knew they'd make the cut (they are the item that consistently sells out). The Tomato Soup Grilled Cheese tastes like it was dipped in that requisite counterpart, Pizzas, pierogis, and a "fucking delightful" baked mac and cheese round out the offerings.

Love says her relationship with Stay Gold is hardly like a landlord/tenant one and much more like a family. "It is a very mutually beneficial relationship," she says, pointing to the "guaranteed clientele" for her new and unknown restaurant. "And obviously people can stay longer if they can get food while they're drinking," she continues. "Toaster loves Stay Gold."

Going Coastal

LIBERTY KITCHEN MOVES TO AUSTIN

If Austin dining once was a scene, it's now a market. For much of our town's existence, few outsiders made much of an impact. The food culture grew organically as a result, into something identifiably Austin. But clamor is hard to ignore, and it became only a matter of time before a market became an investment. Our town is not our town anymore, even if no one agrees on who belongs in that we. Time will tell if the fresh blood and fresh money deadens or exhilarates.

I am not convinced that Liberty Kitchen, the first Austin venture of the Houston-based F.E.E.D. TX Restaurant Group, will really do either. But, for better or worse, it's certainly not hometown.

For one, it readily bucks Austin trends. The cocktail program is fine but not a focus in a town that really likes to drink. The decor is full of tchotchkes and art groupings with barely any reclaimed wood in sight (the raised ceiling does have an installation of rulers). There are no community tables, and the kitchen, while somewhat open, isn't showcased as a theatre. The private dining rooms' chartreuse damask wallpaper, working in an oil derrick, football helmets, and bucking broncos, says just about everything one needs to know about Liberty. They ain't drawing inspiration from Donald Judd.

The menu goes maximalist, too, with two pages and two columns and a bewildering array of decimal points. Gulf seafood takes up a large portion, but they throw in everything from meat

gravy with macaroni and fried chicken to prime rib and pork-belly carbonara. There's no real unifying principle organizing the hodgepodge. Dishes are grouped by type (burgers or mac and cheese), method of eating (hands-on), or (we're guessing) the geographic feature the dish most resembles (plateau).

And instead of small "sharable plates" with minimal ingredients arranged in flowercrowned parabolas, Liberty piles on ingredients in mega-dishes that, uhm, have a troubled relationship with Instagram. The 40-0z. to Freedom Gumbo's (\$33.99) full menu description, for instance, lists "chicken, roast meats, andouille, king crab, shrimp, oysters, fried oysters, lump crab, blackened redfish, potato salad, fried okra." The Heisenburg-er (\$17 for half roll, \$24 for full) crossbreeds a burger and club sandwich and throws on deviled eggs in case your blood still travels unencumbered through your arteries.



Normally, when the prefix "franken" enters the culinary conversation, you get something like Tex Wasabi's Rock n' Roll Sushi BBQ. But Liberty's kitchen sink doesn't forget flavor in all the novelty. The gumbo takes the time to achieve a luxuriously dark roux. The deviled egg trial (\$12.75) tops the halves with smoked salmon, fried oyster, pimento cheese and crab, and buffalo-sauced fried chicken, and serves them all with a side of addictive, if not entirely needed, bacon jam. Each has its own flavor profile to recommend.

> The Shanghai sweet and chile fried whole lobster (\$36.50) reads like a treacly aberration, but escapes with heavy doses of lime and garlic. I will admit the Heisenburger is a bit much, if only because my mustache

makes eating it gracefully near impossible.

The strength of the Shanghai lobster aside, the food does work best when it focuses on the East and Gulf coasts. The spam musubi with a fried oyster (\$5) might work as a bite, but the strong salt of the spam and the oyster's batter overwhelms. Likewise, there was too much soy sauce in the poke salad (\$10.75). The vegetable tagine (\$19) seems like a dish created by someone who might have some lingering resentment at their Morrisseyobsessed cousin. The couscous is served in broth, but somehow it still seemed dry. Some of the sides, like the shaved brussels sprouts (\$9) with smoked grapes and roast cauliflower (\$7) with sultana, taste less considered than the descriptions would suggest.

But East Coast classics do get better served. The large chunks of the Maine lobster roll (\$31.75) are tossed in a good amount of lemon-tarragon mayo, but not enough to

mask the sweetness of the meat. The accompanying salt and vinegar chips were a little milder than we would have liked, but they were nicely crisp. The Georges Bank Haddie chowder (\$9.50) doesn't fit a neat definition of finnan haddie, but it was a sumptuous chowder with a pragmatic dash of thyme. The Bay shrimp dressed salad (\$15.50) takes off from a Waldorf. It's a good argument for becoming a lady who lunches.

The Gulf side is unabashedly Southern. Pimento cheese (\$9.75) is served with ranch crackers, "crazy" roasted oysters (\$3-4.25) are topped with pork belly and bacon, and shrimp cocktail (\$16) is available in a feisty Mississippi Comeback sauce. There's even a banana pudding dessert topped with ambrosia (\$6). Much to the disappointment of my mother, I hate both dishes, but at Liberty they somehow work together. (The \$9.50 pie or cake shakes - custard soft-serve blended with any dessert – are not to be missed either.)

The laid-back but upscale restaurant works in Austin, but there's something that feels a little out of place. Maybe a more definite hat tip to Austin (we demand localness even from those that are not local), or a relationship with a hometown supplier, or, heck, a few more beards would keep it feeling more familiar. That requires some outreach, something we are sure Liberty will eventually do. For now, something in the cuisine's twang saves Liberty from seeming like a complete stranger. Relationships have to start from somewhere. - Brandon Watson

All Power to the People

AFS DOC NIGHTS BRINGS OUT THE BLACK PANTHERS

"I felt absolutely free. I was a free negro. I was making up my own rules. You couldn't get in, I couldn't get out. But in my space, I was the king," says former Panther Wayne Pharr. The emotion recalled from an epic gun battle with an LAPD SWAT team hammers home the overarching message found in Stanley Nelson's The Black Panthers: Vanguard of the Revolution, a comprehensive

and relatively balanced capsule illustrating the still-influential group's history.

"I set out to tell the story of the rise and fall of the Party, a little known history that hadn't been told in its entirety. In particular, I wanted to offer a unique and engaging opportunity to examine a very complex moment in time that challenges the cold, oversimplified narrative," explains Nelson.

Created in Oakland and led by charismatic co-founders Huey Newton and Bobby Seale, the group preached self-love, self-defense, and selfreliance, reaching the masses with free breakfast programs, clinics, and police patrolling. They would legitimize and solidify the movement through a 10-point agenda and intelligent media use, with aid of the "leather jacket and beret" image still associated with the Party.

Reasons for the demise of the Panthers are shown – some clearly detailed in various degrees, others implied - with a painful, scabpeeling nuance. Nelson paints a sobering narrative which greatly contrasts the cult conservation found in Mario Van Peebles' 1995 drama Panther – a dogmatic disservice, that eschewed all Panther-caused faulting, pinning all responsibility on (alleged, but entirely plausible) collusion between government agencies and the mafia to flood the inner city with drugs.

The interviews also bring deep structural issues forming in the dark to light, including Newton's seemingly eternal imprisonment. In cutting hindsight, Nelson covers questionable choices made following Martin Luther King's assassination. Those choices included Eldridge Cleaver's ill-advised escalation in rhetoric, which led, in part, to the death of 17-year-old Bobby Hutton.

The documentary utilizes data astutely - in the form of released memos - highlighting the FBI director J. Edgar Hoover's unofficial position as the slave patrolman emeritus, using the government's Concertina-wired branches to wrap himself around the softer elements of the Panthers' movement. In the director's strongest moment, he moves the prism onto Hoover's most interesting

tactic: the FBI's coercion of local law enforcement, who in appeasement, lined officers up (including those interviewed) as enthusiastic rubes in lockstep with Hoover's wishes. "I think that J. Edgar Hoover was a representative of the state, but he was also kind of working on his own because he had kind of carte blanche to do what he wanted to."

Interviews with police officers and FBI agents provide color and depth, confirming how the COINTELPRO program pushed and pulled the Party into paranoia and created unrest from within - or worse, death. An informant central to the turmoil, William O'Neal, positioned himself as personal bodyguard to the soon-killed Fred Hampton, who Hoover saw as the magnetic messiah figure he'd sought to abort.

Among the (likely unintentional) implied causes posed is the mental volatility of both Newton and Cleaver. Post-prison, Newton would descend into sabotage, converting his faction into something contrary to the original ideals. Cleaver - who wrote the influential Soul on Ice, a memoir and collection of essays detailing inner-city life and his stint as an acknowledged serial rapist - would eventually become a born-again Christian and Reagan conservative, denouncing his activist past. To this end, and at a wider view, the film leaves clues to whether, with anecdotal reference to other movements worldwide, some instability could be seen as a prerequisite for true revolutionaries (in tandem with the equally manic authority figures stopping them.)

"It is essential to me as a filmmaker to try and give the viewer a sense of what it has meant to be black in America and consider this within our contemporary context. The legacy of the Black Panther Party had a lasting impact on the way black people think and see ourselves, and it is important that we look at and understand that."

Feeling an Elephant

THE TORONTO INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL'S INEXHAUSTIBLE BREADTH by Marjorie Baumgarten

The 40th edition of the Toronto International Film Festival, the largest film festival on this continent, wrapped on Sept. 20, and so has my northern pilgrimage for another year. The festival is a film glutton's delight, offering a variety of films that range from early looks at some of the studios' upcoming fall releases, independent works seeking distribution and positive word-ofmouth, and well-curated samplings of international cinema. Dramas and documentaries mingle with genre and experimental sidebars, newcomers' debuts vie for attention against works from proven masters, curiosity and desire do battle with gluttony and fatigue. Even if an attendee views four to five movies a day, over the course of the 11-day festival, the viewer will have witnessed only a fraction of the 298 features included in the lineup. Any personal assessment runs the same risk as that faced in the fable about the five blind

men describing an elephant. You only know as true what your personal experience dictates. My TIFF elephant was a lovely beast, gargantuan but warm to the touch, albeit with some noticeable wrinkles.

My first film upon arrival was film critic and programmer Kent Jones' Hitchcock/Truffaut, which proved to be a perfect means of getting my film juices flowing. Francois Truffaut's 1966 book of interviews with Hitchcock is one of the all-time seminal works of film analysis. Jones interviews contemporary filmmakers about the influence of this book and these filmmakers, and while breaking no new ground, the film was a perfect way to whet the palate for ... more films.

The most unusual film I saw was Anomalisa, written by Charlie Kaufman and co-directed by Kaufman and Duke Johnson, in which puppets



(voiced by Jennifer Jason Leigh, David Thewlis, and Tom Noonan) are used in stop-motion animation to tell a typically eccentric Kaufman tale of anomie. Coming into the festival without distribution, the film was picked up by Paramount, which now has the distinction of being a home for weird puppets, having released in 2004 Trey Parker and Matt Stone's Team America: World Police.

Three of my favorite films were directed by women: Laurie Anderson's delightful personal essay on life and death, Heart of a Dog; Julie Delpy's Lolo, a screwball love story; and Rebecca Miller's Maggie's Plan, which stars Greta Gerwig, an outrageous Julianne Moore, and the always dexterous Ethan Hawke (who, with his stunning lead performance as musician Chet Baker in the festival's uneven Born to Be Blue shows himself to be one of the most adroit actors working today). Two terrific newspaper movies also screened and will be making the rounds in coming weeks:

Tom McCarthy's Spotlight details The Boston Globe's investigation into the pedophile-priest scandal, and Truth stars Robert Redford as Dan Rather and Cate Blanchett in an Oscareligible turn as his producer Mary Mapes, telling the story about George W. Bush's military service that ended their careers at CBS.

In eight and a half days, I viewed a total of 33 films. My sense of the elephant is surely incomplete, but the ride was a resounding delight.

Following the Fantastic **Owen Egerton**

Local Renaissance man premieres his feature debut

"All you need to make a movie is a girl and a aun." - Jean-Luc Godard

A girl, a guy, a gun, and a kinky-romantic Christmas request results in a maelstrom of grindingly intense, hallucinatory horror and not a little humor - in Follow, the feature directorial debut of Owen Egerton, whose seemingly infinite array of talents have apparently never heard the word "boundary."

Honestly, the recent Austin Chronicle "Best of Austin" poll tagged him as Best Local Author/Poet, but that's last week's news. Locals have long known the hypercreative Egerton as a master of whatever artistic endeavor he throws himself into. He was one of the co-founders of Austin's original film-centric comedy confabulation, Mr. Sinus Theater, way back in the Alamo Drafthouse's original, sorely missed, 409 Colorado St. incarnation, and he's also, alongside the equally prodigious John Erler, one of the prime mover/shakers of Sinus descendant Master Pancake Theater, which sells out the Alamo Ritz on a weekly basis.

But wait, there's more. A lot more, like his novels (The Book of Harold, Everyone Says That at the End of the World) and his mindblowingly unique short story collection How Best to Avoid Dying, two stories of which formed the bare-bones basis for Follow.

Clearly, Owen Egerton is a multidisciplinary force of nature. And Follow, which features psychotically excellent performances from Noah Segan (Looper, Brick) and Olivia Grace Applegate, and some of local gore mistresses Hawgfly Productions' most disturbingly realistic special makeup effects, will only serve to cement his growing reputation as "He Who Can Do No Wrong."

"My career arc is confused and nothing to make a plan on," Egerton says with a laugh, before launching into his horror show's origin story

"The key movie moment of my childhood," recalls Egerton, "was watching black and white movies after everyone else had gone to sleep. This was around the time of the birth of cable and I remember watching Night of the Living Dead when I was 10 or 11 years old and

thinking 'I shouldn't be allowed to watch this. This is just too much.' That scene where the daughter comes back to life in the basement was the most horrifying thing ever – and it was great! I mean, I was aware of the slasher sequels that were playing in theatres at the time, Friday the 13th part whatever, but seeing

Night of the Living Dead for the first time, at that age? Man, that was something else."

Prior to Follow, Egerton had been working for Disney and Fox, writing (and often re-writing) screenplays: "And those were all for films I was not necessarily interested in watching. So I thought, 'Well, why don't I write a script for a film that I would be excited to watch, and write it at a budget that I could afford, and then direct it myself?' I needed to take a step back from the studio world, and that's what I did."

FANTASTIC FEST

runs Sept. 24 through Oct. 1 at the Alamo South Lamar. Fest badges are sold out, but often during the festival, individual tickets for films will open up, so patient and intrepid Austinites still have a chance to sample the wide array of films on offer. See www.fantasticfest.com for more info.

The feature film version of *Follow* isn't the story's first iteration, either. Two years ago, Egerton hooked up with Seth Caplan, producer of the Indie Spirit Award-winning In Search of a Midnight Kiss, grabbed actors Jonny Mars and Jessie Tilton, and shot a short, proof-ofconcept version in one day, on Egerton's 40th birthday. That made it into SXSW and from there, the pair recruited producer/financier Chris Colbert, fleshed out the script, and began the casting process. The feature shoot took place over a scant 16 days in a semi-abandoned house in the Clarksville neighborhood. Fittingly for a psychological horror film, the house had both a severely creepy attic and, unusual for Austin, an equally unsettling basement. The shoot, hurried though it was – the property's owner was planning to raze it - turned out to be a model of low-budget, indie perfection.

"The people making movies in this town are outstanding," proclaims the passionate Egerton, recounting the entire production crew's accomplishments like a proud parent ticking off his whiz-kid's accomplishments.

"Scott Colquitt went sleepless to make an abandoned house a home, build an artificial deck, design an artist's basement, and find the perfect Santa candles. Greg Armstrong was our one-man sound team, hunting whispers like a panther.

Ellie Ann Fenton is a light poet and Chris Archer a wonder. Drew Saplin kept the schedule moving, Ezra Venetos worked with Chris Colbert to steer the journey. Sean McQueeney and I spent hours and hours snipping and clipping and building. No one

was getting paid much. I'm sure one national commercial would have paid them more. But we were *making a movie*. Everyone was working their asses off and over and over I was in awe with not only the craft and insight of our team, but also the joy! More than once I started the day with the thought, 'Hot damn, we're making films in Austin, Texas. God must like us."

NICOLAS WINDING **REFN ON HIS NEW BOOK OF CLASSIC FILM EXPLOITATION POSTERS**

Collecting film posters is an obsession that creates a conundrum: What do you do with them when you run out of wall space? If you're Nicolas Winding Refn, and you own a thousand of the sleaziest, scummiest, most wonderful exploitation promotions from the Fifties to the Seventies ever pasted to a cinema wall, the answer is simple: Take the most salacious 300 of them, and turn that stack into a book, The Act of Seeing. He said, "What else am I going to do with it?"

The Drive director is taking the book and 15 of the original posters on a very limited signing tour. However, the Austin stop at Fantastic Fest (as Refn called it, "the CBGB's of cinema") comes with screenings

PROLIFIC DIRECTOR MICKEY KEATING DIALS IN TO THE SIXTIES

Mickey Keating can't stop. The writer/director stunned SXSW audiences this spring with his X-Files-influenced horror Pod, he's debuting his latest feature, Darling, at Fantastic Fest, and he's already in post-production on his next project, Carnage Park. He said, "Honestly, man, I just love making movies, and when I'm not making movies, I'm panicking."

Shot in black and white, and in 1:1.66 ratio as a deliberate homage to Repulsion and Stanlev Kubrick's early work. Keating describes Darling as "a Sixties-style descent into madness." It follows the title character

of three films featured in the book: controversial Italian slavery shocker Farewell Uncle Tom, and a double-whammy of skin in The X-Rated Supermarket and My Body Hungers. Now Refn, who has never seen any of those rare titles, will find out if they live up to the posters' scandalous promise. He said, "A lot of the posters, you could never produce now,

never mind show, because of the times we live in."

Unlike most collectors who search for years, Refn acquired his library in one bulk lot from writer Jimmy McDonough. They had bonded over the author's work on exploitation master Andy Milligan, the king of 42nd Street's grindhouse scene. Refn had already bought McDonough's Milligan archive when the biographer asked if he was interested in the accompanying poster archive.

Refn said, "I wasn't to begin with, but he told me, 'You're going to love this. It's the mother lode." An insatiable collector, he caved. "Eight weeks later, about 1,000 posters arrive, which is a hell of a lot of paper. I was like, 'Oh my God,' and my wife was like, 'Really? You think this is a good idea?' 'Well, maybe not."

This was when the collector's conundrum struck him. He said, "I buy and buy and buy, and then I'm like, 'What the fuck am I going to do with it now?" The resolution came when friend and Drive star Ryan Gosling visited him in Copenhagen to photograph the collection. Refn said, "After a very short period, I felt I was going through a time machine, going through these boxes and boxes. That's when I decided to turn this into a poster book."

Working with British film journalist Alan

Jones, Refn created an encyclopedia of raunch, titillation, and horror, from a Nazisploitation landmark like Love Camp 7, or a forgotten nudie cutie such as Daughter of the Sun. In selecting titles to include, Refn said, "I gravitated towards the ones that had a very extreme crudeness to them, but had some kind of promise of seeing the ultimate fetish, fantasy, or forbidden pleasure." But now that the book is out, he still has the same problem: Where to store a

thousand posters? "I'll probably donate it to a museum in the end," he said. "It's an important historical archive, and it needs to - Richard Whittaker be preserved."

(Lauren Ashley Carter, Pod, Jug Face) as she takes the job of caretaker in a Manhattan apartment, only to discover there's something far more sinister lurking in the Upper East Side than roaches and rats. "I love films about loners," Keating said, and while Darling may be geographically distant from the rural isolation of Pod, they are still connected. He said, "What we really tried to capture was this isolated, ghostly sensibility in a place where there are millions and millions of people at any corner." Carter isn't the only Pod alumnus here,

with co-stars Brian Morvant and Larry Fessenden making the trip to the Big Apple. The reason for their casting was simple: Keating had a great experience working with them the first time. "It seemed like some magical occurrence, so while we're waiting for sound mix, while we're waiting for a composer, let's go make another film."


Some might find that quick turnaround daunting, but Keating pointed to the inspiration of John Cassavetes, who poured his own savings into Faces, or Sam Fuller, who shot the revolutionary Shock Corridor in 10 days. Confronted by that work ethic, he said, "It's hard for me in my mind to make up an excuse and not be inspired. ... If there's a way for me to tell a story that makes sense in whatever box I'm currently confined in, I'll find a way to make it work."

Add Fessenden to the list of influences. Aside from acting, he's also a respected writer, director, and producer, and widely seen as the patron saint of indie horror. Keating acknowledges a huge debt, both creatively and careerwise. As a college student, he found the number for Fessenden's Glass Eye Pix production house in a press release, coldcalled, and ended up with two summers of internships, "watching and observing and doing whatever they needed for me to do." Calling his time there "a tremendously valuable learning experience," he said that for aspiring young filmmakers, "Glass Eye Pix stood as a mecca; you can make art, you can make your independent films, you can tell your offbeat stories."


The trio of Fessenden, Cassavetes, and Fuller weren't the only independently minded auteurs that inspired Keating. During the editing of Pod, he immersed himself in the work of experimental filmmakers Hollis Frampton and Stan Brakhage, and their aesthetics seeped into his own approach to storytelling. He describes that as a reaction to too many contemporary indie horrors that feel like "pseudo-studio films on a smaller budget. You don't see that kind of freedom and enthusiasm with editing and experimentalism that you got in the Sixties and Seventies." - R.W.

She Walks in Beauty

An Austin woman melts Internet daggers into a worldwide shield

You've probably noticed, and I know I'm stating the obvious here, but the Internet can be an incredibly cruel place. Anonymity tends to bring out the worst in people (looking at you, YouTube commenters), and it seems a week doesn't pass without some tragic tale of online bullying or harassment resulting in some pointless violence or suicide. Austinite Lizzie Velasquez discovered this inescapable trend when she logged on to the popular video-hosting site at age 17 to discover footage of her accompanied by the title, "The World's Ugliest Woman." The comments, you can imagine, THE LIZZIE were the worst. But Velasquez, who suffers from a rare syndrome **VELASQUEZ** that has left her blind in one eye, unable to gain weight, and subject to endless prodding and tests, turned the whole thing around by

light on bullying. Her YouTube channel took off (currently hovering at just under 500,000 subscribers), her TED Talk went viral, and suddenly Velasquez was transformed into an anti-bullying activist, traveling the globe and speaking to stadium crowds.

using her story to shine a spot-

A Brave Heart documents Lizzie's story from the beginning. Through home movies and interviews with her family, we learn of

countless surgeries and procedures she had growing up as her doctors tried to figure out what she is suffering from (an on-camera visit to a specialist late in the film explains some of it). But while the film is ostensibly Lizzie's story, the larger takeaway is how this lithe, articulate, and wonderfully

> soulful person took a potentially crippling moment and fashioned it into a weapon against intolerance. As we watch Lizzie transform herself into an

> > international activist, globe-trot to summits, meet with fans around the world (hey, there's Hillary Clinton!), and navigate her health issues, one can't help but feel inspired and humbled against the onslaught of negativity that routinely (and casually) seeps into our daily perspectives. A lifeaffirming doc if ever there was one, A Brave Heart is a litmus

test for gauging compassion, one I would recommend everyone take immediately.

CAPTIVE

D: Jerry Jameson; with Kate Mara, David Oyelowo, Mimi Rogers, Michael Kenneth Williams, Leonor Varela, Jessica Oyelowo, Matt Lowe. Michael Mercaldi, Melissa Eastwood. (PG-13, 97 min.)

Based on an actual event in March 2005 that made headlines all over the world, Captive is ostensibly a two-person hostage drama sporting a strong, upfront message of evangelical Christian values as espoused in Saddleback Church founder Rick Warren's fiendishly popular self-help treatise The Purpose Driven Life. While I'm not certain of Warren's purpose – his bestselling book presumably netted him an ungodly amount of money - Captive's main purpose appears to cause skeptical film critics to snooze through something akin to The Desperate Hours meets Sunday school. An odd mix, to be sure, but fulltilt performances from Mara, as meth-addicted, widowed mom-cum-kidnappee Ashley Smith, and Oyelowo, playing the stone-cold killer turned cornered kidnapper Brian Nichols, help this spiritual thriller rise (very slightly) above other, more hamfisted, heaven-friendly fare.

After breaking out of prison, Nichols, armed and leaving a trail of fresh corpses behind him, ends up at Smith's tatty apartment. She's just returned from a 12-step meeting where a copy of Warren's book was given to her. Not much of a reader, apparently, she chucks it in the trash only to have it returned to her. Once Nichols kidnaps her in her own home, she attempts to defuse the situation by engaging her tormentor in emotion-laden conversations about their respective families and, eventually, begins reading to Nichols from The Purpose Driven Life. If that's not enough to make anyone wave the white flag of surrender, I'm not sure what is. It all plays like some strange variation on Stockholm syndrome minus the Swedes, or possibly a religious riposte to Craig Brewer's Black Snake Moan.

While hostage negotiators do their thing outside, Nichols and Smith carry on inside as best they can in a crazy-tense situation. There's plenty of moralizing on hand – and plenty of clunky chunks of expansively wooden dialogue as well. Still, Mara and Oyelowo manage to evoke a passable connection between their characters. That's about the only good thing I can wholeheartedly say about Captive, which in all other respects hews close to a TV-movie template, including plenty of static talking-head shots. Yawn.

GOING CLEAR: SCIENTOLOGY AND THE PRISON OF BELIEF

D: Alex Gibney. (NR, 119 min.)

Since its inception, the Church of Scientology has obsessively shrouded itself in an impenetrable cloak of secrecy, using all kinds of (scare) tactics to successfully obscure its inner workings from public view. That is, until now. The HBO documentary Going Clear: Scientology and the Prison of Belief, which closely adheres to Lawrence Wright's acclaimed 2013 book of the same name, doesn't merely peek under the church's zealously maintained guise. It disrobes this controversial religion to reveal

an emperor without clothes, an organization that runs on fear and weakness, seducing its impressionable members with the promise of freedom from the harmful emotions of the reactive mind (i.e., "going clear") in return for their unwavering commitment to the sect. According to the film, Scientology is a belief system empowered by mendacity, harassment, manipulation, and psychological and physical abuse. And that's just for starters. Karl Marx famously likened organized religion to an opiate, a palliative that deadens the existential pain suffered by the faithful. As some of the video clips in this documentary attest, the narcotic of Scientology induces a state of altered consciousness in its adherents as powerful as any controlled substance, but without the syringe or the pipe.

Like its literary source, the film is a little scattershot, referring to things like the Sea Organization (the core Church membership reputedly treated like indentured servants) before providing any backstory to fully appreciate the reference. The cast of talking heads in Going Clear consists primarily of former members who voluntarily left the church, from the recognizable television actor Jason Beghe, to Oscar-winning screenwriter/director Paul Haggis (Crash), to once-prominent Scientology leaders Mike Rinder and Marty Rathbun. There's a strong undercurrent of shame and regret in these interviews, which are undoubtedly motivated by the notion that the truth will set one free. But it's the nonparticipatory presence of Scientology's most famous ambassador in the film that stays with you the most. In video segments scarier than any couch-jumping antics on a talk show, actor Tom Cruise salutes the organization's Napoleonic chairman David Miscavige like a soldier in an army of darkness, and rambles

THE GREEN INFERNO

D: Eli Roth; with Lorenza Izzo, Ariel Levy, Aaron Burns, Kirby Bliss Blanton, Magda Apanowicz, Daryl Sabara, Ignacia Allamand, Nicolás Martínez. (R, 100 min.)

First shown in Austin as one of Fantastic Fest 2013's "secret screenings," Eli Roth's riff on the horror subgenre of tropical cannibal movies has finally arrived in theatres with less of a scream than a whimper. It's not that the film's quasi-ironic take on privileged, white activist college students' farcical attempt to save a fertile slice of the Amazonian rain forest from loggers already feels hackneyed - that's part of the "fun" in gore-tastic horrors such as this and Ruggero Deodato's infamous Cannibal Holocaust (obviously a huge influence on Roth). Nor is it the fact that these do-gooders unsurprisingly end up captured and slaughtered by a local tribe that views any Anglo incursion to be better-suited for disembowelment than displays of friendship. The Green Inferno's problems lie more with its plot, which is generically routine. It is exactly what you think it is, and no more. Unlike Roth's best, most harrowing films (Cabin Fever, Hostel: Part II), which contain

plenty of out-of-left-field shocks that double down on their already-queasy storylines, The Green Inferno feels like a retread of a retread. (And it's almost certainly been heavily edited to secure the precious R rating.)

Levy (of Nicolas Lopez's superior 2012 Chilewood" effort Aftershock) is the head campus activist who leads an annoyingly naive but nonetheless enthusiastic crew of like-minded cannibal fodder to Peru where, following what feels like an extremely requisite plane crash, they are set upon almost immediately by the tribe. As the initially skeptical Justine, female lead Izzo gives one of the film's only non-rote performances. Toward the end of the film, she's painted solid white in preparation for a dire cannibal ritual, which invariably leads to unwanted thoughts of Bo Derek's mud treatment in 1981's Tarzan, the Ape Man. Sheesh.

The Green Inferno does have a few good things going for it, however, chief among them the hellishly good (and, indeed, hallucinogenically green) cinematography of Antonio Quercia. Greg Nicotero and Howard Berger of KNB EFX don't stint on the gore, either, even if most of it will likely only be seen as part of the DVD extras – one ocular incident, in particular, will have audiences squirming long after they exit the theatre. Despite those high points, the once unstoppable Roth seems to have entered into a career cul-de-sac with Green Inferno (the marketing campaign has taken some serious negative hits on Twitter of late, too). Like its protagonists, the film's mix of gutsy - pun

intended - enthusiasm and scripted naivete feels just slightly off-key. Ultimately, it's only marginally more disturbing than finding a fingernail in your bloody red burger.

HOTEL TRANSYLVANIA 2

Let's take a moment to consider the feckless career of Adam Sandler, Once upon a time an SNL star on the rise, he hit pay dirt with a series of successful Nineties comedies (Billy Madison, Happy Gilmore, The Wedding Singer) before flirting with greatness (Punch-Drunk Love), and then self-reflection (Funny People), before finally settling into a nadir of horribly themed rom-coms (Just Go With It, Blended), excuses to party with his celebrity bros (Grown Ups 1 & 2), and downright fucking weirdness (The Cobbler). He tapped ex-SNL writer Robert Smigel to help craft 2012's Hotel Transylvania, a familyfriendly animated romp that performed quite well. And here we are, three years later, checking in to that establishment once again for an uninspired sequel that may entertain the wee ones for 90 minutes, but leaves their adult handlers out in the cold.

When we last left Dracula (Sandler) and his daughter Mavis (Gomez), she had fallen headover-heels for Jonathan (Samberg), an anomalous human amidst the monsters that comprise the "Drac Pack": Frankenstein (James), the Invisible Man (Spade), the Wolfman (Buscemi), and the Mummy (Key, taking over for CeeLo Green, who smartly bowed out of this entry). The film opens with Mavis and Jonathan's wedding, and soon after, little baby Dennis appears, and Dracula couldn't be happier. Except Dennis is slow to exhibit his vampiric tendencies, which makes Dracula worried that his monster genes have not taken, and he may just be a dull human. So while Jonathan takes Mavis to visit his parents (Offerman and Mullally, doing their respective things) in Santa Cruz, Calif., the Drac Pack seeks to teach toddler Dennis the benefits of being a monster.

While the theatre full of children I shared this screening with chortled and guffawed at the various antics, if you're over 10 your mileage may vary, despite the movie's 3-D embellishments. The film relies too heavily on silly puns for comedy, and doesn't throw any (funny) bones toward the older audience. Channeling your inner child, you may find solace in Hotel Transylvania 2, but in the end it has no bite, doing continued disservice to the Universal monsters it scabs out, and adding another soiled feather to Sandler's cap of mediocrity.

THE INTERN

D: Nancy Meyers; with Anne Hathaway, Robert De Niro, Rene Russo, Anders Holm, JoJo Kushner, Andrew Rannells, Adam DeVine, Zack Pearlman. (PG-13, 121 min.)

Playing a 70-year-old seeking renewed purpose as an intern at an Internet startup, Robert De Niro is gentle as a kitten. Is it disrespectful to want to greet this icon of American cinema with a snuggle and a tumbler of warm milk?

Nancy Meyers has certainly been accused over the years of making excessively snuggly movies. But she doesn't get enough credit for smuggling the occasional rusty nail under the covers. The Intern falls in line with the films she made first as a screenwriting partner to Charles Shyer (Baby Boom, Father of the Bride) and then as a solo writer/director (Something's Gotta Give, It's Complicated). It's a body of work that marks three decades of soft-focused cinematic takes on topics du jour: the working mom, the empowered divorcée, senior sex. Meyers has always been savvy about what's trending, and long before somebody invented a word for it.

Of course, savvy is not the same as insightful, and Meyers' m.o. - an exceptionally profitable one - has been known to dress her films like a Pinterest wall of ideality, a save-to-shopping-cart vision of aspirational living. (Come for the A-list actors, but leave mulling a farmhouse sink.) The Intern's main staging grounds - Brooklyn brownstones and a converted warehouse space - provide plenty of ammunition for a Pottery Barn trigger finger. Everyone here is dressed and pressed way too nicely, most especially Anne Hathaway's Jules, who runs the Internet fashion company that De Niro's senior citizen Ben comes to work for. But once you get past the film's overwhelming well-appointedness - and its har-de-har first entrée into the story of a

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techno-yearling finding his legs in his 70s what emerges is a compassionate picture of two like-minded people driven to put in a good day's work.

Ben, bored by retirement, wants only to be useful again, and he lucks into a role as right-hand to Jules just as her position in the company she founded is threatened by its investors' desire to bring in an experienced CEO. There are some comical set-pieces borne out of the age gap, and likable enough supporting players who underline the lessons one might learn from an old-timer: I didn't laugh all that hard at it, but the preview audience did. I was more struck by the film's attempts - rudimentary but genuine to talk about Jules' struggles with balancing the professional and personal. (Meyers didn't make up the word "monogamish" but it's the first time I've heard it in a studio film.) By the third act, the comedy flies out the window to give the floor to teary monologues wherein actors recite exactly what you'd want to hear in your dream life. It's all a well-dressed fantasy, sure, but at least the conversation is unique.

TINSELTOWN NORTH

PAWN SACRIFICE

D: Edward Zwick; with Tobey Maguire, Liev Schreiber, Peter Sarsgaard, Lily Rabe, Michael Stuhlbarg, Robin Weigert, Evelyne Brochu. (PG-13, 114 min.)

You don't exactly have to go searching for Bobby Fischer in this fictionalized account of the chess master's world championship bout against the Soviet Boris Spassky -Fischer fills nearly every frame of the film, from nervous boy genius to troubled teen genius to paranoiac racist adult genius. Tobey Maguire plays him in this latter incar-

nation. Historically, he's an aloof actor, so often playing an outsider (The Cider House Rules, Sam Raimi's Spider-Man pictures), and he can finesse that remoteness, perforate it like cheesecloth; intelligence, soulfulness have a manner of slipping through. But the Fischer character is drawn, by the actor and filmmakers alike, as a cipher. Try to sift the aloofness and all you find is more rock-hard impenetrability.

Director Edward Zwick makes movies that require heroes, like a rebel freedom fighter (Defiance, Glory) or a lovesick cowboy (Legends of the Fall). He hasn't adjusted his approach to accommodate a central character that can't cross the board like a conventional hero. Pawn Sacrifice pushes through the decades with a Forrest Gump-like gloss on history - cue the archival footage reel set to a Top 40 tune - and celebrates the conclusion of the Spassky-Fischer match with a montage of Americans celebrating at home, including the kindly hooker who deflowered Fischer and the mom that abandoned him (and the film abandoned in kind). It's Hollywood hokum hugged around a sour little arthouse movie trying to chew its way out.

Zwick gets good work out of his supporting cast, including Michael Stuhlbarg as Fischer's much-abused agent and Peter Sarsgaard as his mentor, a Catholic priest; they're tiptoeing through the same minefield but take different steps around Fischer's increasing demands and conviction he's being spied on. Best yet is Liev Schreiber playing Spassky, big as a Russian bear and as ice-cool as the country's signature 80-proof spirit. Is it unpatriotic to wish this was his movie, not the twitchy American guy's?

a Hollywood filmmaker who's best-known for helming disaster pictures such as Independence Day, The Day After Tomorrow, and White House Down, Stonewall also arrives with a pedigreed script by two-time Pulitzer nominee Jon Robin Baitz. However, it's the film's total lack of novelty that causes it to misfire and become if not a total disaster, then at least a narrative flop.

Stonewall uses a device common to films set against historical backgrounds by anchoring the story in a naive protagonist who's a newcomer on the scene. Danny (Irvine) arrives on New York's famed Christopher Street fresh from Indiana, which he fled because of his homosexual proclivities. He's been shunned by his dad (Cubitt), the high school football coach, and denied by his former suck buddy, Joe (Glusman), the team quarterback. Instantly, Danny falls in with a ragtag gang of transgender hustlers and vagabonds who live hand to mouth (so to speak) and show him the ropes. In particular, Ray/Ramona (Beauchamp, in a strong performance) takes Danny under her wing, and introduces him to the bars and the Stonewall Inn, a mob-run hangout (like most of the gay bars of the time) for drag queens, trans men and women, gay prostitutes, and runaways. Danny, who hopes to start at Columbia University in the fall if he can get his parents to sign his scholarship paperwork, is so white-bread that he can only accept Ray's friendship while rejecting her fantasies for their domesticated bliss. Danny eventually hooks up with Trevor (Rhys Meyers), a member of the Mattachine Society, the male gay rights organization of the Fifties and Sixties that advocated acceptance and social integration.

Although the Stonewall revolt is condensed into one night of rioting rather than the several nights that actually occurred, historical accuracy is less the film's problem than its ham-handed narrative arc and dialogue. Nothing occurs in the movie that can't be predicted in advance. Maybe Stonewall will have more value to younger viewers for whom the riots and gay marginalization in general are distant history and might be vivified by watching the film. Yet even though the film's heart seems genuine, its structure is buttressed by falsies.

AMERICAN ULTRA

D: Nima Nourizadeh; with Jesse Eisenberg, Kristen Stewart, Connie Britton, Topher Grace, Walton Goggins, John Leguizamo, Bill Pullman, Tony Hale, Stuart Greer, Michael Papajohn. (R. 95 min.)

By turns sweet, sadistic, and silly, American Ultra is an initially engaging slice of stoner action rom-com (surely the nichiest geek subset yet explored), but the film's twinned tones of hapless, ganjafied anti-heroics and pinkmisted ultraviolence soon turn into a haze of repetitively bloody set-pieces. Eisenberg (surprisingly well-cast) is Mike, a perpetually buzzed nebbish who suffers from crippling panic attacks and assorted neuroses alongside his long-suffering, co-stoner better half, Phoebe (Stewart). No spoiler here: Turns out Mike's actually an amnesiac, deep-cover experimental death machine for the CIA, and what kicked off as a bong-on idea for a tale of two tokers in love and peril soon reveals itself as just another genre-mashing shoot-'em-up with a dark, romantic secret at its heart. Not a bad trip to the movies if you can pull yourself up off that Cheetos-encrusted couch, but also not anywhere near as subversively adept as what you'd hoped for. (08/21/2015)

O BLACK MASS

Too soon? By necessity, this crime drama about the notorious South Boston gang leader James "Whitey" Bulger begins in a hole it can never dig out of. It's the portrait of a monster told in a flat line. Initially, Johnny Depp's Whitey is hiding in plain sight - not exactly inconspicuous with his cadaverous makeup and icy blue contacts - but, when he turns informant, Black Mass soon evolves into a dual narrative, with Southie boy John Connolly (Edgerton) becoming Bulger's handler. In theory there's an arc there - the fall from grace of a once-reputable lawman who becomes the protector of a psychopath - but Connolly's depiction suffers from the same flatlineitis. If only the film could have sustained its momentum. or found a way into feeling not just showing Bulger's dark depths. Sprawling yet incomplete, Black Mass might not be just too soon, but too much. While the film provides some insight into the personal lives of a few of the climbers - such as the macho Texas doctor whose brashness masks a depressive streak (Brolin) - Icelandic director Kormákur and screenwriters William Nicholson and Simon Beaufoy wisely choose to tell this ensemble-driven story in a methodical, almost documentary-like fashion, without any overt commentary on the hubris of lofty dreams. The first Mexican CGI-animated feature to receive a wide release in El Norte, Un Gallo con Muchos Huevos is every bit as goofy-smart as one would hope. Writer/director Alatriste's story, about conquering youthful insecurity and literally "learning to fly," overflows with an abundance of corny gags and spot-on homages. Unfortunately, the film also revolves around the inherently vile "sport" of cockfighting, albeit without the gruesome realities. The star is Toto (Bichir), a scrawny, insecure teenage chicken who eventually must enter the cockfighting arena to save the bankrupt farm that's home to his beloved Di (Perroni), his parents, and a baker's dozen of chatty, ambulatory eggs. Viewed entirely on the exceptional virtues of its CGI animation and its occasionally raunchy humor. Un Gallo feels fresh and breezily entertaining - but the film's representation of cockfighting as a fluffy-tough, preteen-friendly experience will surely be a rightful stumbling block for many potential audience members. Bon mots and withering sarcasm tumble out in a steady stream, but underneath it all is a refreshingly true-to-life story of three generations of women - full of sharp observations and superlative performances by Tomlin and the rest of the cast - that will have you happily following the film over the river and through the woods. Her long slough toward divorce is efficiently but effectively detailed when Darwan and Wendy's tracks cross again, as Darwan teaches Wendy to drive. 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Bob Dylan Goes Electric - Again!

Lost amongst Bob Dylan's many landmark moments of the mid-Sixties, including his electric attack on the **Newport Folk** Festival (July, 1965), his mysterious motorcycle crash (July, 1966), and his "Judas!" performance at Royal Albert Hall (May, 1966, and the show it references actually occurred at Manchester Free Trade Hall), is the birth of his historic collaboration with Basement Tapes buddies the Band at a concert in Austin 50 years ago today, Sept. 24.

The 24-year-old songwriter had just begun dismaying sweater-wearers with his evolution from folkie to rocker when a young Texas promoter named **Angus Wynne** cold-called the singer's manager Albert Grossman to secure Dylan's first Texas gig.

"He was a king coming in," says Wynne. "Dylan was very popular here because he'd sold a lot of records and was well-known for writing songs that other people recorded."

Accordingly, Wynne had no trouble moving \$2-4 tickets for the concert, which took place at Austin's **Municipal Auditorium**, a large, seated hall where the Palmer Events **Center** stands today. Wynne was especially pleased to learn the backing musicians were Levon Helm, Rick Danko, Robbie Robertson, Garth Hudson, and Richard Manuel - then known as the Hawks whose master roots groove he'd witnessed when he booked their onetime employer **Ronnie Hawkins.**

"They were the badass backing band of the time," declares Wynne.

Dylan arrived locally on a commercial flight and was met by a San Antonio-based promotions rep from Columbia Records named Joe Mansfield.

"I picked him up at the airport," remembers Mansfield. "He had this girl with him. I said, 'Who's that girl?' He said, 'She's a photographer - Annie Leibovitz.'"

The iconic photographer was iust a teenager at the time.

"I told Dylan the TV and radio stations wanted to do interviews with him and he said, 'I don't want to do that," continues Mansfield. "I said, 'It's really important that you do it.' Bob finally said, 'If you can find an old gas station with an oil-change pit, I'll do interviews in the bottom of that.

"So I went out and found one. And he did it." Dylan's Austin debut unfolded with a solo acoustic set including "Desolation Row" and "Mr. Tambourine Man" from the newly released Highway 61 Revisited. For his second set, the Band plugged in behind him.

"The second half of the show was pretty loose," remembers Wynne. "They started playing and, after a few minutes, Bob turned around and said, 'Crank it up!' Then everybody turned their amps up as high as they'd go and it overpowered the vocals. It was disconcerting, but also exciting. It was an experiment."

Mansfield recalls reaction to the volume.

"Everybody booed. They weren't ready for it." Wynne's recollection of the second set, which included "Just Like Tom Thumb's Blues" and eternal-closer "Like a Rolling Stone," differs.

"I don't think there was any real animosity about it," he offers. "Or if there was, you couldn't hear it anymore once the band started."

Veteran musician, booker, soundman, and Bob-head Paul Minor honors Dylan and the Band's locally historic golden anniversary with an all-star musical salute. The

at Threadgill's World Headquarters Downtown, features 25 local artists including Carolyn Wonderland, Jonathan Terrell, Miles Zuniga, Sabrina Ellis, Guy Forsyth, Jimmy Smith, Earl Poole Ball, Rosie Flores, Colin Gilmore, and Carson McHone performing era-specific Dylan material with a house "Band."

Denny Freeman, the local guitar stylist who backed Dylan for over 500 shows and played on the album Modern Times, adds an air of authenticity to this weekend's tribute. Reinterpreting Dylan songs will be old hat to Freeman considering his onetime employer's own curveball interpretations.

"It was totally unpredictable," Freeman assesses of his tenure on Dylan's Never Ending Tour from 2005 until 2009. "We had a set list for each night and we even rehearsed before every show, but when we'd get the set list on the way to the stage, it wouldn't be unusual for a song to appear that I'd never heard of, much less played.

"Musically, it's kind of hard to talk about playing with Bob Dylan because nothing was ever the same. The only thing that didn't constantly change was the uncertainty about everything."

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HOLY MOUNTAIN'S LAST HURRAH

"I think we had the perfect-sized room to help nurture bands," appraises Holy Mountain owner James Taylor. "There were bands that three years ago could barely bring 20 people out on a Wednesday night who can now draw a crowd. For them, this room was where they grew up."

File Shakey Graves and Wild Child in that category. Taylor booked them together in 2011 when the club was still Beauty Bar. Those locals, both respectfully skyrocketing thereafter, returned to play a secret show at Holy Mountain to start the week. The venue vacates on Monday due to a rent increase.

Graves, who just snatched Emerging Artist of the Year at Nashville's Americana Awards, delivered a loose and personal performance that peaked with interlude-heavy versions of "Tomorrow" and "Proper Fence." Meanwhile, the Austin native - always the realist - offered his thoughts on the club's closure.

"I don't want this to be a sign of anti-growth in this town, but one of responsibility," he says. "If there's a venue you love, go there and spend money or it might get paved."

Taylor, who moves to Minneapolis next month, says the club's final days have been gratifying and surreal.

"Whether it's bands shouting me out onstage or regulars telling me Holy Mountain was a huge part of their life, it's special because, when you're doing it, it's a job. You don't stop to think how much it matters to people."

Last Saturday. Alex Elmiger, owner of vaporized alcohol specialists Minibar, confirmed that he's leased the space at 617 E. Seventh St., and will "keep it music-oriented." Holy Mountain summits with a stellar sign-off: tonight, Thursday, yields post-rockers This Will Destroy You, Friday funks with Hard Proof and Magna Carda, Saturday rawks employeebands Eagle Claw, Not in the Face, and Feral Future, and Sunday closes down with Mike & the Moonpies, East Cameron Folkcore, and **Harvest Thieves.**

New Venue to Occupy Former Red 7 Space =

Austin's live music faithful have been battered with bummers all summer via Red River's Seventh Street corridor, notably the shuttering of clubs Holy Mountain and Red 7. Wednesday's news brought hope to the district. A new venue will take over the former Red 7 building.

"We signed a five-year lease on the old Red 7 at 611 East Seventh Street last week and it's going to be a music venue," Johnny Sarkis confirmed via email.

In addition to Sarkis, a former partner at Red 7, ownership at the new venture includes Hotel Vegas owner/operators Jason McNeely and Brian Tweedy, Flesh Lights guitarist Max Vandever, and Cliff White. The group hasn't announced the name of the venue and plans to keep progress of the project private.

"We're going dark for a while and taking some time to create a space and brand that we're all excited about," wrote Sarkis. "Stay tuned."

McNeely will handle the lion's share of booking at the new space. He and **Hot Burrito Productions** partner Tweedy have a laudable track record as venue booker/managers. After transforming Spider House's fledgling venue annex into a popular rock & roll hang, they exited to sign on as co-owners of Hotel Vegas in 2012, upgrading it from an underachieving dive into one of the Eastside's most vibrant music venues.

Red 7 closed on August 28 after not being able to negotiate a new lease with their landlord.

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eslie Sisson's house sits less than 100 uards from mine. We didn't know we were neighbors until this summer. It's from her home that she and her boyfriend were kidnapped at gunpoint in 2011.

"It wasn't the fault of the neighborhood, just a random thing," she says, almost convincina me.

A carload of gang members from Galveston had been stopped by police nearby, not far from an I-35 access road motel where they were staying. Sisson points to the front room window that once housed an AC unit where the one who escaped on foot got into the house around 4:30am that rainy December morning. She says her partner found him crouched by the door waiting for someone to either enter the house or come out from one of the two back bedrooms. A rash of car break-ins on her block the night before might have been the work of the crew.

Today, central air and heat regulates temperatures inside, and an alarm system sign sticks up from the ground outside the front door. Sitting where her mother died of a drug overdose that same year, in a living room bright with animal decor and mouthwatering thrift store finds you might find hanging on the wall in a Mad Men episode, the Moving Panoramas frontwoman describes the PTSD she suffered after the incident and still today. The few feet to the carport were once a terrifying negotiation, and she describes a branch falling outside one day causing her to cower under the kitchen table.

"SIMS saved my life," she says, lauding the local mental health nonprofit for musicians.

"Believe," the second to last song on the female trio's debut, One - dreamy pop readymade for famed UK label brand 4AD – was written a week after the events the singer/ songwriter/guitarist details herein. Its aquatic, Best Coast-like ebb ("Try to lock the windows tight") belies her forthright selfpossessedness. She admits to being "super shy" before her Roller Derby career, but her warmth and personability betray no introversion. Even so, Leslie Sisson nods soberly at the horror her story elicits.

"Eventually, I have to get out of this - Raoul Hernandez house," she admits.

THE BACKSTORY

I was born and raised in Dallas, primarily in the suburb of Duncanville, the same place where Elliott Smith spent most of his youth before moving to Portland to live with his dad as a teenager. Strangely, we had similarities in that suburb, both children of divorce at a very young age, him with an abusive stepfather, my mom with an abusive, alcoholic boyfriend. There weren't a lot of musicians around when I was growing up except for my father, who I too eventually moved in with as a teenager, but that's where Smith began writing music, and I began the same.

After high school, I moved to Denton to study music at UNT, but thanks to film electives, I fell for moving pictures. I relocated to Austin to finish my degree in filmmaking and followed that with a master's in video art, both from UT. While in grad school, I received a fellowship and bought a house in the North Loop area, which was pricey because it's considered a safe neighborhood.

After college, I moved to New York City for work in film production. I'd joined Roller Derby during its early rebirth in Austin with the Texas Rollergirls, so I helped get the New York Gotham Girls league off the ground, skating under the

In March 2011, I came to Austin for a month to record my solo album, Harmony, with Louie Lino at Resonate Music. My mom was renting my house at the time. That month, I played a number of shows at South by Southwest, both solo and with the Wooden Birds, my mom front and center at most of them. I finished recording that month, toasted Champagne with the Wooden Birds,

Moving Panoramas flicker to life in the aftermath of a home invasion

moniker Rolletta Lynn. I was even featured in The New York Times thanks to it, but the busier it got, the more time it took away from playing music, so I retired.

While still living in Brooklyn, I began playing in an Austin-based band, the Wooden Birds, with my longtime friend Andrew Kenny of the American Analog Set and Matt Pond of Matt Pond PA. I toured in the latter's band as well. Things were looking up for the Birds, and Kenny, who's like a brother to me, suggested I work on my own music between tours.

hugged my mom goodbye while exchanging loving words of how proud we were of each other, and took a flight back to NYC.

When the plane touched down in Atlanta for connecting flights - still taxiing on the runway - my father called to tell me my mom had died while I had been in the air. If hearing such news trapped on a plane and in tears wasn't bad enough, the real hell was yet to come. I later found out my mom died of an overdose.

The Wooden Birds were scheduled to tour that summer for our second LP, Two Matchsticks (revisit "Free as a Bird," Aug. 12, 2011). I was between freelance videoediting jobs in New York and decided to stay in Austin to be closer to my family and the band. After the Birds finished touring, Kenny took a break from the road that turned into an indefinite hiatus.

My solo disc that fall prompted a supporting slot with Tapes 'n Tapes on some dates. The teaming ended in Austin at the brand-new Emo's on Riverside. For the shows, I hired a bass player from the Midwest, and soon after he moved to Austin. We began dating.

THE KIDNAPPING

A few months into our relationship, December 2011 - in the same house where my mother had recently passed - my new boyfriend and I were awakened just before dawn by someone breaking into the house through an AC window unit. The intruder, fleeing the police through my neighborhood, sought to hide and get out of the rain. He threatened our lives, forced us to take pills at gunpoint, robbed us, and finally kidnapped us in my boyfriend's car.

Believe it or not, I was sympathetic to him because he appeared to be a drug addict, something I'd seen firsthand with my brother, then serving time in prison due to drugs, and my mother, who had been a recovering addict. Due to my sincerity, the intruder made it clear that once we were out of the house, he wanted to find a motel and have his way with me. He commented on my body, asked about my sexual past, tried to get me to kiss him, and held me way too closely with a gun to my head while he directed my boyfriend to gather things to steal.

We both felt certain we were going to die. Once in the car, my fight-or-flight instinct kicked in and I started to strategize an escape, which I credit to years of Roller Derby. As a jammer, my job was to "find the hole" and "visualize an out." Simply jumping out of the car wasn't an option because the kidnapper was sitting behind me in the passenger backseat with a gun to my back while my boyfriend was driving. If I fled, the kidnapper, who was a tall, fit, African-American man, could easily shoot my boyfriend and outrun me.

That morning, we stopped at a gas station along I-35 off the St. Johns exit to get supplies for our "long drive ahead," and to get money from the ATM. While my boyfriend was inside, the kidnapper started panicking that he was calling the cops. Whatever all three of us had taken appeared to be kicking in, so I knew I had to make a move soon.

My brain tried telling my hand to open the car door and run, but my motor functions were slowing and any move I made startled the kidnapper. I even recall trying to mouth the words "help" to a man in a truck parked across from us. I tried talking the kidnapper into letting us go, but he said he was too messed up to drive and wanted to take me with him. He decided to ditch my boyfriend and told me to climb into the driver's seat to drive.

This was my "out."

As I crawled over the console into the driver's seat, I glanced over my shoulder to see if the gun was pointed at me. It wasn't. In one swift move, as I reached for the steering wheel, I instead opened the driver's side door, jumped out, and ran full speed toward the gas station just as my boyfriend exited. In what felt like slow motion, he threw the bags he was carrying in the air, and we ran down the street to another gas station. While the attendant called the police, we locked ourselves in an office and stared anxiously out the window as I vomited everywhere.

When the police arrived, they didn't believe our story at first. I didn't care. I was just glad to be safe. The paramedics found my heart rate abnormally high, so they took me to the ER. I have a mild heart murmur.

The hospital gave me something to counteract the drug, which they discovered was PCP. I was told I would have eventually gone into cardiac arrest, and recall the ER doctor saving how ironic it was this happened to me in Austin and not in NYC. Once released, we staved in Dallas with my father. The kidnapper was apprehended a week later.

THE AFTERMATH

A month later, New Year's Day, my good friend Esme Barrera – a guest on *Harmony* earlier that year – also fell victim to a home invasion in Central Austin. The outcome was far worse. Her violent, senseless death shook me further.

Weeks after that, a former roommate heard about my kidnapping and proceeded to stalk me, threatening my life via social media. The police intervened. He too was a drug abuser suffering from delusions and became obsessed, thinking I was writing songs about him.

As if things couldn't have gotten any worse, the police informed me the kidnapper had been charged with murder and was

being moved to another city on those charges. A few weeks before our episode, he allegedly broke into someone else's home and killed a man and his teenage daughter. He's still awaiting trial for capital murder.

For the next year, I suffered intense PTSD. Leaving the house was difficult even though it was the same one from which I was kidnapped and in which my mom died. Only my part-time job teaching music to kids after school at Austin's School of Rock got me out.

I didn't feel safe anywhere, not at work, not at home, not at my dad's, not even at friends' houses. At least at the school, playing music every day and giving something back to the kids helped ease the anxieties and fear that were causing me nightmares and debilitating my everyday "normalcy."

The relationship between my boyfriend and I didn't last, but we remained bandmates for a bit and are still friends today. Although I was playing daily at the school, my music endeavors at that point also suffered from the trauma, and I never got to follow through with releasing my solo record on a proper label. I was writing songs like crazy though.

Mentoring a student from the school, Rozie Castoe, I wanted to include her in my next project as a way to demonstrate the efficacy of songwriting as a creative outlet. That's how I learned. I could tell she needed it.

I was offered freelance editing work in NYC the following year, 2013, during which time I was bouncing back and forth between Austin and Brooklyn for work and music. I realized I felt much safer in my neighborhood in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, than I did in my Austin house.

Nevertheless, late that year, Rozie and I entered Louie Lino's studio to work the songs I'd been writing into an EP. I called a longtime friend to play drums, Karen Skloss, a former bandmate and UT film classmate. We began performing in Austin, our live debut falling on Valentine's Day 2014. The city gave the band more love than expected, so I decided to move back full time.

Originally, we were billed as the Panoramas, but became the Moving Panoramas after being contacted by an Eighties French band of the same moniker. The frontman wrote to inform us the name was owned by a larger label. He liked our music and offered to help us play in France someday.

The EP eventually turned into 10 songs and after nearly two years of on-and-off recording, our debut LP, One, will finally be released on Modern Outsider Records on October 2. The songs are about my recent journey.

Time heals if you can tough it out - bear down, wait it out, be patient - and ease the senses with music, writing, photography, walking, running, skating, biking, swimming, hiking, dancing, yoga, meditating, cooking, cleaning, gardening, singing, talking, laughing, loving, hugging, texting, calling a parent, getting a pet, and reaching out to a therapist. Anything besides reaching for the bottle or a vice or giving up, which I nearly did.

I have a hard time hearing these words sometimes, especially recently, but One is a direct result of that from beginning to end. Hopefully it helps too.

MOVING PANORAMAS One (Modern Outsider)

Transportive albums are rare. From the outset of the opening title track - where one becomes a number of singular independence and strength – the Austin trio lures the listener into an anesthetic dream of enveloping chords melting against hypnotic rhythms. Leslie Sisson's voice and guitar winds with patient urgency, the calculated shoegaze tension calling on her experience with Andrew Kenny (American Analog Set) in their short-lived group the Wooden Birds. "Radar" sinks into a reverb lull against the wanting "Tonight," while "Always" slowly pulls at the shimmering threads of a

pillowy soundscape, simply but beautifully woven. "Magic" and "Word" open the backside with a heavier pulse and brief break from the drowsy waves as Sisson, bassist Rozie Castoe, and drummer Karen Skloss explore a broader range, but closing triptych "Please," "Believe," and "Harmony" settle back into the soothing flow. One rings evocative, emotive, immersive.






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
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Will Johnson CD Release

Will Johnson lights up about baseball. The prolific Austin singer-songwriter roots for the St. Louis Cardinals, who have the highest MLB stats so far this season. Asked about the I-70 World Series when the Kansas City Royals defeated the Cardinals in 1985, Johnson laughs.


"I would love it if that happens [again] for home state sake," he says. "I'm not the kind of Cardinals fan that turns their back on the Rovals, but I wouldn't mind exacting a little revenge."

Sheryl Crow and her sister were childhood babysitters to Johnson in Kennett, Mo., before his family moved to Killeen, He took piano lessons from Crow's mom, with whom he stays in contact. Lately, Johnson's been doing a series of house concerts, so the CD release party for Swan City Vampires at Waterloo Records is a bit of a rarity. The title of the new album was inspired by threatening vampires and peaceful swans.

"I wanted the juxtaposition of tranquil and dangerous because of the songs," he explains. "There are moments on the record that are significantly raw and uncomfortable. And there are moments that are subdued and peaceful."

> At 44, Johnson's become the kind of songwriter that Jason Isbell and Patterson Hood quote. His grandchildren's children will play his songs and brag about their lineage.

Trumpeter Herb Alpert describes himself as a "right-brained kind of guy," which may be putting it mildly. Besides leading the Tijuana Brass and cofounding A&M Records with partner Jerry Moss, Alpert's a formidable visual artist. He was preparing to install nine giant bronze totems at Chicago's Field Museum when we spoke.

"I like to live on that side of my head, so that's what I do most days," he says.

The visual element loomed large when Alpert developed his distinctive sound. A fan letter from Germany in the wake of 1962's "The Lonely Bull" confirmed it.

"She said, 'Dear Mr. Alpert, thank you for sending me on this vicarious trip to Tijuana.'" he recalls. "When it sunk in, I thought, wow, that music was so visual to her that it transported her."

Even if his Tijuana proved as fantastical as "Surf City," its cultural resonance was huge. In 1966, Alpert sold more records than the Beatles.

"I want to just play the trumpet within the range that it was designed for, which is up to C, high C, and then leave it at that," he says. "Let those other guys go for the artillery."

Now 80, Alpert tours with his wife, original Sergio Mendes and Brasil '66 vocalist Lani Hall, in support of Come Fly With Me. The new album's

title track reimagines the Sinatra classic as a tropical getaway.

"The minute those steel drums come in after the first bridge, you get that feeling of being someplace in the Caribbean," he offers. - Greg Beets

Last year, Ralf Hütter, 69, garnered Grammy's Lifetime Achievement Award. Their road machine rhythms found eternal embodiment in the movement's metronomic theme song, "Autobahn." Lizzy Plapinger knows what it takes to make it in pop. One half of the NYC dream dance duo alongside Max Hershenow, the singer co-founded Neon Gold Records in 2008, and it now houses Haim, Charli XCX, and Marina & the Diamonds. Like the musicians Plapinger surrounds herself with, MS MR delivers a live punch. Her sleek vocals and Hershenow's mysterious aesthetic blend compellingly. - María Núñez

CHAMELEONSVOX, MY JERUSALEM Parish, Friday 25

Manchester's Chameleons never broke through to a mass audience, but the 1981-birthed acid goth act had a profound effect on British and alternative guitar groups, and their fans cross over from loyal to rabid. Singer Mark Burgess keeps the dream alive in ChameleonsVox, surrounding himself with sympathetic players and delivering passionate performances of classic material. Billed as a farewell tour, this trip features the band playing Chameleons' debut LP Script of the Bridge. Austin's My Jerusalem open. - Michael Toland

In 2015, psych pop lives on through dreamy aggrandizers like Tame Impala. All modern practitioners step aside for the Zombies, the seminal UK act that brought the genre to mid-Sixties perfection with melodically baroque gems like "Time of the Season" and "She's Not There." No strangers to ATX since reforming two decades later, keyboardist Rod Argent and singer Colin Blunstone encore last spring's conquering of Psych Fest with a performance of its initial swan song, 1968's Odessey and Oracle. - Kevin Curtin

Love is knowing that you could have your whole world obliterated by something completely beyond your control and yet still crashing headfirst into that uncertainty - even embracing it - because, for some insanely unfathomable fucked-up reason, it is precisely what gives your existence meaning and value. What is love? Baby don't hurt me.
