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Open Season

"It is time we started a conversation about just when and where loaded firearms should be considered socially acceptable, not just what the law allows."

Reader Susan Cook wrote that last week in a letter to the editor. Because I'm a content provider – the fashionable term now for people who jam journalism into the Internet's trash compactor – my first thought when reading her letter was, hmm, there's a fun story there: the Ps & Qs of open carry. (No wearing white after Labor Day, fancy-dress holsters suggested for PTA meetings!) My second thought was more sober: *Oh shit, this is really happening.*

Our annual Top 10s issue is devoted to the year that was, not the one that will be here soon enough. But there's no way to process 2015 – a year in which mass shootings became as regular as sunrise and sunset, and presidential candidates made a recruiting tool out of xenophobia and religious intolerance – without worrying how much worse it's going to get once Texas' open carry law goes into effect on Jan. 1.

Though Gov. Abbott may think Austin – Texas' seat of government since 1839 – is too liberal to live in, the fact is, we're not in a bubble here. Despite our city's long history of imagining us fixed in tie-dyed amber, this is no progressive paradise where the rest of the state's lunacy won't tread. The open carry movement has already brandished AK-47 rifles within spitting distance of the UT campus, in the most recent instance of public protest. (Protesting *what* exactly? Is this right to wear guns as hip-loud as a fanny pack not in fact going into law?) Open carry may feel like a freight train, but the tracks have been laid for a long while.

My parents live in Georgetown – a lovely community that voted heavily Republican

in the last presidential election. Is it fair to equate "Republican" with "totally cool with waving guns around at the mall and the local Cinemark"? Maybe not, but if there's a divide in the Texas Republican Party over the issue, the nays are about as loud as a stage whisper. And if being a Republican means being in support of the politicians who made open carry law the law of our land – and *that*, it follows, means being totally cool with waving guns around at the mall, and the local Cinemark, and the seafood

Place my parents frequent every Sunday night, where the waitress already knows their order before they sit down – then it makes sense that my Mom and Pop are pet-

rified. When I join them for dinner at that seafood joint, the conversation too often has drifted to the places they dream about moving to. Safer harbors where they know the next booth over won't be packing heat.

I admit – their exit plans have reminded me of liberals' threat to move to Canada if Dubya won the presidency back in 2000. Of the presumably few who actually made good on the promise, I've genuinely wondered: How'd that work out? Is the poutine as good as they say? Is there still room for the rest of us?

That's a joke. Kind of. It's not actually funny at all that two people who've spent the majority of their lives as law-abiding citizens of Texas, who pay their taxes and, in my mom's case, paid a lot more as a career public teacher, feel like there's no longer a safe place for them in this state. They're not the only ones, not by a long shot. Pause to reflect: Have you really thought about what it means to be shopping for cold cuts at the grocery store and the customer next to you has a visible weapon on their body? To send your child to freshman orientation knowing her roommate quite possibly packed a gun along with her PJs? And then once that's sunk in, you've got to wonder - is this actually the Republican leadership's endgame? To make our state so unlivable - nice head start gutting women's health care access, guys! - to send all their detractors scattering to the four winds, looking for somewhere they're statistically less likely to be shot while enjoying their shrimp scampi?

This is sounding cynical. That wasn't my intent. OK, there was that crack about "content provider," but I still file "journalist" on my W-2 form every year with a flush of pride.

That's pride in what this paper does, together, every damn week. Because the people who put out this paper believe powerfully – religiously, even – in the work we do reporting the news, from open carry to marriage equality to the latest club opening, and from a progressive point of view. The work we do reflects the community and responds to it. And that includes everyone, from our investigative reporters and the front desk receptionist who fields so many calls from crazies, to the office staff who makes salad on free-lunch Wednesdays and the ad reps who pound the pavement to remind community businesses who we are, what we've done, and what we still do every, yes, damn week. Of the last – that's especially hard work. Print media is in a tailspin, and the *Chronicle* is not immune from an industry-wide collapse. Think about that the next time you pick up a *Chronicle* just to pack a moving box.

Did that sound aggressive? I didn't mean to. (Nahhhh, maybe I did. Which isn't to say the *Chronicle* hasn't cushioned my every move across town.) It's hard not to turn to truculence. Venerable alt-weeklies all over the nation are shuttering. A lot of days, it feels like we're at war. But I look around, and what magnificent comradesin-arms I find in these trenches.

My boss Louis Black has in this space paid tribute to a lot of people who made this paper what it is today. I'd like to pay tribute to the ones who do that work now. There are the lifers who built our reputation and also serve as our institutional memory, remind us of that story we ran that time back then - we should dig that up, maybe the source still wants to talk? And then there's this vibrant new guard, the ones who make sure we're not just a record of what once was, but what is now, and what is next. Every week they all get together in a room to talk about the next week's issue and make one another laugh. Then they go back to their desks, and they get back to work. They get back to the fight. I'm so proud to be one of them.

SAME RULES FOR ALL

Dear Editor,

In response to Uber Austin's open letter found in *The Austin Chronicle*, Dec. 18, 2015:

Despite the complaining and marketing by Uber, at its core it is a cab company. Like any other cab company it uses vehicles to pick people up and take them somewhere else for a fee. The major difference from other cab companies is how Uber cabs are summoned. As a friend of mine said, "Uber is a phone app."

The number of vehicles used and the number of drivers employed doesn't alter the fact. To read Uber Austin's letter, you'd think that anyone riding in any other cab company's vehicle is taking their lives in their hands and other drivers are on the verge of going on the dole. To the contrary, cab rides in Austin, as with almost everywhere else in the U.S., are relatively safe for both riders and drivers, and drivers manage to make a living.

Uber, Lvft, nor any other company wishing to do business deserves preferential treatment. All similar companies should have to abide by the same rules. Government should not make laws, rules, or regulations that favor one business over another without a significant and compelling reason which benefits the public. The "bribes" paid other companies that have come to town should never have been paid. One of the world's largest and most profitable companies, Mercedes-Benz, should never have been given monies either real or in kind to bring their rental cars to Austin. And how do local businesses that rent out bicycles feel about the city spending hundreds of thousands of the tax dollars they pay to do business for a competing company to be given an unfair advantage?

The city should make one set of rules for all competing businesses and apply them evenly. That means that all cab companies should operate under the same set of rules where applicable, whether the vehicles are cars, trucks, driverless vehicles, pedal cabs, rickshaws, boats, or whatever. The doling out of favors, economic and/or political, to add even higher profits to the pockets of wealthy upper-management types is one of the factors that motivated me out of Austin after 33 years.


Also, Uber is not without its faults. The people I know who drive for Uber have mentioned how Uber has cut fees paid to drivers. And the people I know who have used Uber have talked about the oppressively high fees charged during peak periods, such as a \$100 minimum to go anywhere Downtown during South by Southwest.

It seems what's really being fought for here is continued high salaries for those at the top, at the expense of those who work for, use, and/or are taxed to support Uber. What almost all businesses want when they say they aren't afraid of competition is a flat playing field, not a level one. That's what Uber Austin is after. *Clifford Wilkes*

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

APD'S DWI "NO Refusal" initiative continues tonight, New Year's Eve, so don't drink and drive (as if you needed another reason).

SELF-REGULATION: THE LATEST front in the ride-for-hire controversy is a petition drive initiated by a coalition calling itself "Ridesharing Works for Austin" - and including TNCs Uber and Lyft – that seek to place on the November ballot an ordinance eliminating fingerprinting and other TNC safety measures initiated by City Council in December. The coalition blames Council for the companies' threats to leave town if they don't like the new regs.

JIM BOB MOFFETT is retiring as chairman of Freeport-McMoRan, the gold and copper mining conglomerate he founded in the Nineties, accused of environmental and human rights violations at its Indonesian copper mines, while the company's Southwest Austin real estate projects around Barton Creek triggered the movement that became Save Our Springs. Declining commodities prices and other problems have recently decimated Freeport's stock value.

POLICE CHIEF ART Acevedo handed six-vear veteran Officer James Ayers a four-day suspension Tuesday for insubordination and violations of general attendance. Ayers had established a reputation for arriving late to work between March and August. When asked to meet with superiors about the tardiness, he "admittedly used profanity while providing excuses for being late" and proved insubordinate when tasked to write a memo about his habit

JUST STAY HOME: Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton pursued his vocation of suing the federal government, this time the **Environmental** Protection Agency for new restrictions on smog that the state considers too strict. The EPA says a smog reduction from 75 to 70 parts per billion could prevent 325,000 cases of childhood asthma - the state responds that most people spend most of their time indoors.

STICKY-ICKY STICKLAND: Rep. Jonathan Stickland, R-Bedford, took a hit this week when primary challenger Scott Fisher released online postings by the gun-toting state rep from last decade seeking advice on growing marijuana and cheating on drug tests. Apparently "Stick" (as he called himself) was also looking for a "smoking buddy" to share "da green."

RETENTION DEFICIT: A new report by State Auditor John Keel shows Texas state agencies lost 18% of classified staff in the 2015 fiscal year. with the Department of Aging and Disability Services (32.2%) and the Juvenile Justice Department (26.6%) faring worst. The report comes on the heels of a judicial ruling that Texas' foster care system is so understaffed that overburdened case workers regularly burn out.

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UBER, LYFT FORM PAC, PUSH PETITION

Apologies to anybody who wished talk of transportation network companies (TNCs) would take a holiday. No sooner than five hours after learning that Lyft and Uber had banded with TechNet, ATX Safer Streets, and Austin Music People to introduce a political action committee - Ridesharing Works for Austin – designed to collect the 20,000 petition signatures from registered voters necessary to make the current interim TNC rules adopted in 2014 by the previous city council permanent via either Council adoption or public referendum on the next uniform election, was I being whisked away from Austin-Bergstrom International Airport in the backseat of a Lyft, getting pitched on why I should sign the petition before we'd even left the terminal.

I realized via Facebook the following morning that the Lyft I rode in was driven by an individual who's either a Ridesharing Works organizer or a devout advocate for the agency.

She wore a pink Lyft shirt, offered us water and hard candy, and two clipboards worth of petitions in the back seat pocket of her car (as well as a pink Lyft sign in her trunk). After a few interjections to inform her that I had no intention of signing the petition, she conceded that her personal desire is for the city to abandon TNC regulations altogether. The specific act

of fingerprinting - the straw man masquerading as the crux of the standoff between Council and the two TNC giants – was not an issue for her in either principle or practice: She's already been fingerprinted for her day job, and recognized that the city has offered to pay for onboarding TNC drivers to file their fingerprints (and may put into place other initiatives to ease the process). The first few lines of her pitch seemed almost scripted, however, like she'd been coached by either the companies or advocates on what to say. Upon arriving at my house I exited the car confident of one thing in particular: Ridesharing Works for Austin will prove successful in obtaining the 20,000 necessary signatures. Some riders may be persuaded to sign the petition just to get drivers to stop their pitches.

It's hard to tell at this point what exactly is the issue that's "forcing TNCs to leave town" - or, as other, more reasonably minded people would phrase it, result in the two largest and most powerful TNCs in the market voluntarily pulling out of Austin. Two weeks ago at City Council. stakeholders debated for five hours the particular issue of fingerprinting as if that were the only issue. Licensing fees? Fine. Trade dress and other operating requirements like the creation of pick-up zones and maintenance, as well as a bit of data reporting? No problem. (Sticking with the current ordinance would negate all the aforementioned and effectively render TNCs unregulated. It would also serve as a somewhat strengthened death blow to the already hurting taxicab industry.)

Both Lyft and Uber said they would leave Austin if mandatory fingerprinting were implemented across the industry. Both failed to explain why adding the requirement was such an issue. The elephant in the room seemed to be simply that companies did not want to assume responsibility for the requirement.

Mayor **Steve Adler** and CM **Ann Kitchen**'s last-minute compromise – to amend the ordinance to create an incentive program that would result in 99% of TNC drivers being fingerprinted by Feb. 2017 – has been largely derided as "kicking a can down the road," but there's a hint of creative intrigue to it. Under the provisions, the city would offer incentives to drivers (what those are will be laid out in late January) in order to get the fingerprint rate up to 50% by August, and 85% by Dec. 2016. As of today, there are no defined penalties for non-compliance.

Ideally, what the plan would do is create an

image of acceptance for the practice of fingerprinting that's largely void of any corporate politics. If drivers took the city up on the incentives, and in doing so indicated that getting fingerprinted wasn't a nuisance, and the companies didn't see a downtick in their onboarding of new drivers, there would be little reason to cause a fuss about what's in reality a common civic expectation. If

the process did hit resistance, Council could readjust its expectations – or the TNCs could leave the city once and for all. A decision could be deliberated based on experiential testimony, rather than the ultimatums issued by two wonderfully funded San Fran companies.

Success on the part of this PAC, however, will undercut any ability for the fingerprinting process to show its true colors, and give Uber and Lyft – and many of their drivers – what they wanted the whole time: inconsequential regulations and very little civic accountability. The problem, if the effort succeeds, is that those who'll eventually support the PAC won't ever know what transportation around Austin could be like if TNCs had it any other way. – *Chase Hoffberger*



Ambiguous Oracle

Company's new Austin campus displaces longtime residents

On Dec. 22, software megafirm **Oracle** announced a major expansion plan for Austin. In its press announcement (released jointly with Gov. **Greg Abbott** and Mayor **Steve Adler**), the company said it would be building a "next-generation technology campus" in Austin, and would purchase housing to be available for employees "nearby." The company said the Austin project is "driven by growth in Oracle's cloud sales organization, Oracle Direct," and that it would expand its Austin staff (currently about 1,100 people) by more than 50%. The company is based in Redwood City, Calif., and has more than 130,000 employees worldwide.

But attorneys representing former tenants of the apartment complexes emptied and cleared to accommodate the Oracle campus described the new project, and the city's welcome, as "a slap in the face" to the mostly low-income former residents.



Gov. Abbott and Mayor Adler welcomed the company's announcement. "Thanks to our skilled workforce, combined with our low-tax and low-regulation environment," Abbott said, "one of the largest tech companies in the world has chosen to expand in Austin." The mayor said, "What Oracle is doing in Austin reinforces what I'm talking about when I say that great cities do big things, especially in the technology sector. With this significant investment, Oracle demonstrates that it believes in Austin and its future, and it's serious about creating fantastic job opportunities in our community. I look forward to working with major employers like Oracle to tackle our biggest challenges, including mobility and affordability."

But affordability was also on the minds of the former residents of Lakeview Apartments – roughly 200 families with moderate incomes – some of whom are reportedly still awaiting the return of their security deposits and any help from the city in finding comparable housing within city limits. The southeast neighborhoods around Lakeshore Boulevard, Riverside Drive, and Pleasant Valley had provided some of the most affordable rental housing in Austin, but the older stock of apartment complexes is steadily being replaced by high-end and mixed-use developments unaffordable for the original tenants.

A nonprofit legal services firm, **Texas RioGrande Legal Aid**, is representing former residents of the Lakeview Apartments in their dispute with **Cypress Real Estate Advisors**, which sold the property to Oracle. In a statement released by **Stephanie Trinh**, TRLA called Oracle's plans "a slap in the face to the residents who once resided there."

"Oracle, the City of Austin, and the developers may be pleased with this move," continued TRLA, "but it is emblematic of the largest problem affecting this city, and each has done what it can to ignore the residents who once resided there."

According to TRLA, Cypress effectively drove the former residents out of Lakeview in September, stopping repairs and ending leases with threats or early terminations, while refusing to answer questions and denying tenants any relocation assistance. As TRLA sees the situation, "Oracle, the world's second largest software company, will now benefit from Cypress Real Estate Advisors' wrongdoings, as the city welcomes Oracle with open arms. What was affordable housing in a low-income neighborhood is now office space for one of the wealthiest companies in the world." While not directly blaming Oracle for Cypress' actions, TRLA suggested the company help its clients find "decent, affordable places to live." The TRLA release concludes, "The Lakeview families shouldn't be treated like pawns in this developer's game."

Daddy's Philosophy

This special day got me to thinking about America's spirit of giving, and I don't mean this overdone business of Christmas gifts. I mean our true spirit of giving – giving of ourselves.

Yes, we are a country of rugged individualists, yet there's also a deep, communityminded streak in each of us. We're a people who believe in the notion that we're all in this together, and we can make our individual lives better by contributing to the common good.

The establishment media pays little attention to grassroots generosity, focusing instead on the occasional showy donation by what it calls "philanthropists" – big tycoons who give a little piece of their billions to some university or museum in exchange for getting a building named after them. But in my mind, the real philanthropists are the millions of you ordinary folks who have precious little money to give, but consistently give of themselves, and do it without demanding that their name be engraved on a granite wall.

My own Daddy, rest his soul, was a fine example of this. With half a dozen other guys in Denison, Texas, he started the Little League baseball program, volunteering to build the park, sponsor and coach the teams, run the squawking P.A. system, etc., etc. Even after I graduated from Little League, Daddy stayed working at it, because his involvement was not merely for his kids ... but for all. He felt the same way about being taxed to build a public library in town. I don't recall him ever going in that building, much less checking out a book, but he wanted it to be there for the community and he was happy to pay his part. Not that he was a do-good liberal, for God's sake indeed, he called himself a conservative.

My Daddy didn't even know he had a political philosophy, but he did, and it's the best l've ever heard. He would often say to me, "Everybody does better when everybody does better." If only our leaders in Washington and on Wall Street would begin practicing this true American philosophy.

TOP 10 CITY COUNCIL STORIES by Michael King

1) DISTRICT POLITICS The new **10-1 City Council** got a year of governance under its belt – with a slow start but more effectiveness over time – and began to reflect a greater range of public priorities.

2) SELLING SHORT The fate of **short-term rental units** – or at least the "Type 2," nonowner-occupied variety – entered 2015 on a short leash and exited 2015 on a shorter one, and in the New Year, more renter control awaits.

3) SMOKE BUSTERS In an early misstep, council members attempted to address some hyper-local disputes over barbecue smoke with a citywide policy on scrubbers – it never got past the discussion stage before with-drawal, but evoked national foodie outrage and PR embarrassment.

4) HOME\$TEADING A property tax "**home-stead exemption**" was popular on the 10-1 campaign trail, but less popular on the dais, where it was winnowed from an expensive 20% to a symbolic 6% – with promises of a higher phase in.

5) ZIMM CITY District 6 Council Member **Don Zimmerman** provided steady opposition and entertainment on the dais, from his wacko commission appointments, his angry denials of climate change, his outrage over gay marriage ... and a campaign finance lawsuit against the city. 6) UNAPPEALING The city challenged, unchallenged, sued, and is now deciding whether to appeal the dismissal of its challenge lawsuit against the **Travis Central Appraisal District**, on its claim that commercial property valuations are too low, to the disadvantage of homeowners.

7) VERY SORE LOSER Despite a run-off loss and a recount loss, defeated District 4 Council candidate **Laura Pressley** refused to concede defeat, filing a contest and then a lawsuit she also lost, and then was hit with hefty sanctions. Never-Say-Die Appeal awaits.

8) IN THE MONEY Thanks to an unprecedented 12.5% growth rate, Council was able to produce an FY 2016 budget that provided a homestead exemption, increased social services, and (slightly) cut tax payments. But everybody still hates growth

9) A ROOF FOR GRANNY After months of preparation, Council greatly expanded the ability of homeowners to build "**accessory dwelling units**" (aka "granny flats") on single-family lots, potentially adding thousands of rental units and (in theory) bending the housing cost curve.

10) THROWING A FINGER In its final 2015 meeting, Council adopted "incomplete" regulations for **transportation network ("ridesharing") companies**, with driver fingerprinting "benchmarks" that Uber and Lyft reject – next year we'll learn if reasonable minds prevail.

TOP 10 LOCAL STORIES by Michael King

1) DROUGHT ENDS, FLOODS BEGIN The wettest year in Austin history was marked by devastating spring and fall floods, the former throughout Central Texas, the latter a reprise of the 2013 Halloween **Onion Creek** disaster. "Resiliency" became the new watchword of weather response. (See "Top 10 Environmental Stories," p.21.)

2) OFFICIAL IMMUNITY In October, federal Judge Lee Yeakel granted former Austin Police Detective Charles Kleinert immunity from prosecution for the 2013 killing of Larry Jackson Jr., because Kleinert was on a federal task force at the time – meaning no state criminal accountability. (See "Top 10 Criminal Justice Stories," p.18.)

3) KELLERS RELIEVED In May, the Court of Criminal Appeals granted partial relief to **Frances and Dan Keller**, imprisoned in 1992 after a fantastical witch-hunt prosecution for alleged child abuse at their Oak Hill day care center. Their convictions were overturned, but without a ruling of innocence – leaving the Kellers in legal limbo, and Travis County prosecutors still in disgrace. (See "Top 10 Criminal Justice Stories," p.18.)

4) GOVERNOR FOR LIFE? Rick Perry – officially becoming The-Longest-Serving-Governorin-Texas-History – finally stepped down in January from his endless regime, then took one last swipe at a presidential run, to a predictably early exit. It's some comfort that the national electorate isn't as credulous as that of Texas – although among this year's field, hardright Perry was just too moderate. (See "Top 10 Lege Stories," p.16.)

5) LOVE WINS "It's a good day to be Texan," said State Rep. **Celia Israel** in June, celebrating the historic U.S. Supreme Court ruling on **marriage equality** and the hundreds of Austin gay and lesbian couples tying the knot at the Travis County Clerk's office. "I feel like a real citizen today," said one happy spouse. 6) FAILED COURTSHIP A small November turnout narrowly rejected a bond proposal for a new Travis County civil courthouse, leaving an inadequate and crumbling Heman Marion Sweatt venue still overburdened, and

Commissioners Court wondering what's next.

7) JUMPOLIN PIÑATA'D In February, East Cesar Chavez business Jumpolin (selling piñatas and other party accessories) was abruptly demolished by landlords F&F Real Estate Ventures, who wanted to use the site as a spring festival venue. The legal battle (and neighborhood protests) ensued for much of the year, with a confidential settlement concluded in December.

8) IDIOTICALLY YOURS In March, an arrogant, self-appointed "culture jammer" posted pseudo-official, racist "whites only" stickers on East Austin businesses, purportedly in protest of gentrification – thereby stirring a wrongheaded local and national frenzy that threatened minority-owned businesses. The headline-grabbing escapade was brief, ridiculous, and self-defeating.

9) THE NEW SEGREGATION In February, a report from the University of Toronto identified the Austin/Round Rock metro area as the most "**economically segregated**" large metro area in the country, as the region's general prosperity has failed to trickle down to the working poor, especially minorities. The report generated much official breast-beating, but adequate solutions remain elusive.

10) PROPERTY PROPS In May, after months of preparation, City Council launched a formal challenge to the commercial appraisals of the **Travis Central Appraisal District**, in what was initially an administrative procedure and eventually a lawsuit, currently in limbo after dismissal by a state district court. The dispute hasn't ended, but the city is considering its next move.

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TOP 10 REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS STORIES by Mary Tuma

1) HB 2 AT SCOTUS' DOOR After issuing a stopgap to the disastrous final provision of **anti-abortion** law **House Bill 2** in late June, the **U.S. Supreme Court** decided to take up *Whole Woman's Health v. Cole* for review in November. In a case that is expected to set the course for abortion rights nationwide, the nine justices must determine if the Texas Legislature can get away with purporting to protect the health and safety of women with a law that painfully shows women will instead suffer. A ruling is expected by June.

2) KICKED OUT, FIGHTING BACK Like the classy chap he is, Gov. Greg Abbott first announced the state would kick Planned Parenthood out of the Medicaid program via Twitter. Later that week, the state officials sent the health care provider a letter announcing they would soon be booted out of the program based on the notorious, highly edited sting videos pushed by anti-choice group the Center for Medical Progress. The good news is that courts have successfully blocked similar attempts in other states, and PP has hit back with a class action lawsuit in November claiming the state is breaking federal Medicaid law. A hearing date has yet to be confirmed.

3) BYPASSING SAFETY Conservative legislators managed to drastically chip away at a process meant to help typically abused or neglected teenagers access abortion with **HB 3994**. **Judicial bypass** – the legal process by which a teenager averts parental consent to undergo abortion through securing permission from a judge – is considered an important "safety net" for teens. That safeguard was severely eroded at the hands of the Lege, namely bill author Rep. **Geanie Morrison**, R-Victoria, who added substantial barriers to the process, reaffirming that lawmakers are more interested in politics than protecting a vulnerable population. 4) HB 2 FALLOUT The damage left in the wake of HB 2 continued this year: Only 18 abortion clinics remain of the 41 that existed before parts of the law went into effect. Studies from the UT-based **Texas Policy Evaluation Project** showed wait times to get an appointment have drastically risen (up to 20 days) and, startlingly, as many as 240,000 women are estimated to have attempted to self-induce their abortions. If the final part of HB 2 passes legal muster at SCOTUS, Texas will have fewer than 10 abortion clinics for a population of nearly 5 million reproductive-age women.

5) LOCAL LOVE FOR PLANNED PARENT-

HOOD In a 9-2 vote, **City Council** stood with Planned Parenthood by amending the city's federal and state legislative agendas to include lobbying support for any bill that would maintain or expand funding for the provider or women's health care in general. **Travis County commissioners** followed suit, lending their support in a 3-1-1 vote last month. With all the hostility thrown at Planned Parenthood this year, it's a relief to see the city and county showing some love.

6) CUTTING CANCER FUNDING In a legislative maneuver overtly meant to punish abortion providers, lawmakers crafted the state budget to exclude Planned Parenthood patients from a lifesaving **breast and cervical cancer screenings program**. While cancer survivors condemned the move as life-threatening, it did little to stop the governor from signing the budget. One bright spot: Tenacious local protester **Sadie Hernandez** camped out at the Governor's Mansion to rally against the cuts, drawing national media attention to the issue.



7) CAMPAIGNING FOR ACCESS With legislators doubting Texas women's ability to make autonomous decisions about their own bodies at every turn, a coalition of seven progressive organizations (including NARAL Pro-Choice and the ACLU) struck back in February, unveiling a new multiyear policy campaign to ensure women are able to make their own health care decisions. The "Trust. Respect. Access." initiative also seeks to repeal anti-choice laws and introduce bills that support women's health care.

8) ANTI-CHOICE SHAKEDOWN In the ongoing assault on Planned Parenthood, state officials barged into the provider's offices in four cities completely unannounced in late October, demanding thousands of personal patient records and sensitive information, including clinical notes and lab results from 2010 to the present. While they later slightly refined their request, the state's intrusive theatrics prove they'll stop at nothing to intimidate the provider.

9) MONEY FOR NOTHING Taxpayer-funded **crisis pregnancy centers** – the network of nonmedical, religious pseudo-clinics meant to deter women from undergoing abortion – received double the funding from magnanimous anti-choice lawmakers in 2015. While actual health clinics that offer preventative, lifesaving services are shuttering by the dozens, the CPC propaganda-mills hope to usher more women into their doors to feed them (documented) medical misinformation.

10) BAD BILLS DEFEATED While this year's Legislative session shepherded some dangerous bills to the governor's desk, a handful of atrocious potential laws thankfully died – some due to Republican infighting: legislation that would have banned **health insurance** plans from covering abortion care, given **legal representation to fetuses**, and prevented women from obtaining abortions in cases of **fetal abnormality** all failed to pass.

TOP 10 LEGE STORIES by Richard Whittaker



1) MEET THE NEW BOSS, WORSE THAN THE OLD BOSS Dan Patrick replaced **David Dewhurst** as lieutenant governor. First order of business: raise the thermostat in the chamber, which Dewhurst famously kept at icy levels. Item two: hurl the upper chamber further to the far right.

2) SCHOOLS UNFINANCED AGAIN Just because Judge **John Dietz** told the Texas Legislature that the current school finance system was unconstitutional, that didn't mean they fixed it. Instead, lawmakers considered a partial reform adding \$3 billion over inflation and population growth, and slightly altering how it's distributed; then they added only \$1.5 billion, and deferred any structural changes until after a Texas Supreme Court ruling due in 2016.

3) GUN NUT'S DREAM The session started with gun rights groups overplaying their hands, sending not-so-subtle threats to lawmakers and parading around the Capitol with empty holsters. It ended with them getting their way on both **open carry** and **campus carry**. Guess all those NRA lobbying dollars paid off.

4) UNHEALTHY FIXATION The GOP's constant efforts to capsize **Planned Parenthood** and restrict abortion access continued, but in more muted terms than in the 2013 session. Arguably, because they'd already done so much damage, there was little left to break.

5) FAREWELL TO THE OLD GUARD A quadruple blow as four of the most respected and venerable lawmakers quit. For the Democrats: Austin's Rep. Elliott Naishtat (arguably the Legislature's most learned voice on health and human services issues); newly elected Houston mayor Sylvester Turner, the fiscal Cassandra as the ranking Democrat on House Appropriations; and Sen. Leticia Van de Putte, who made a failed run for mayor of San Antonio. Also bidding adieu was House Education Committee chair and school finance advocate Jimmie Don Aycock, R-Killeen.

6) BAD DEALS: Another session, another agency in scandal, another chief forced out. This time it was Health and Human Services Commissioner (and former state senator) **Kyle** Janek, plus his chief counsel (and former Travis County state rep) Jack Stick, resigning after brutal Senate Finance Committee hearings on massive contracting irregularities and allegations of nepotism. The House General Investigating and Ethics Committee then launched an investigation into no-bid contracts at 11 agencies. 7) UNETHICAL BEHAVIOR Republicans took advantage of the bad press surrounding Travis County District Attorney **Rosemary Lehmberg**'s 2013 DUI arrest to eviscerate the **Public Integrity Unit** based in her office and move most of its work to the Texas Rangers. Meanwhile, lawmakers failed to pass the sweeping ethics reform that Gov. **Greg Abbott** claimed was one of his top priorities.

8) THE BREAKFAST HEARD AROUND THE DOME Friction between the GOP's right, far right, and lunatic fringe was put into sharp (and hilarious) context when Patrick met Abbott and Speaker **Joe Straus** for breakfast, and reportedly demanded that they stop "picking on me."

9) STICKLAND IN THE MUD Has any sophomore legislator made more noise and fewer friends than Rep. **Jonathan Stickland**, R-Bedford? His second term under the dome was marked by a near-fistfight with a fellow Republican, regularly getting corrected for factual and procedural errors on the floor, and a highlight of getting kicked out of a meeting of the House Transportation Committee for falsifying witness testimony.

10) STINGERS GET STUNG Ugly attempts by right-wing troublemakers the **American Phoenix Foundation** to shoot incriminating undercover footage of lawmakers (mostly centrist Republicans) backfired when even right-wing noise machine Breitbart Texas refused to run the tapes, and big time APF donor **Jeff Sandefer** demanded his money back in protest of their antics.

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TOP 10 CRIMINAL JUSTICE STORIES by Chase Hoffberger

1) WHAT HAPPENED TO SAMANTHA

DEAN? A pregnant employee of the Kyle PD shows up dead behind a Dumpster near a Bastrop County building. Four-year APD veteran VonTrey Clark becomes a person of interest in the killing. He's indicted on charges of capital murder in October, as is an associate, Kevin Leo Watson. Clark pleaded not guilty to the charges in November.

2) KLEINERT GETS OFF A century-old loophole officially known as "Supremacy Clause immunity" allowed former APD Detective Charles Kleinert to escape charges of manslaughter for the July 2013 death of Larry Jackson Jr. Kleinert had been indicted on the charges by a Travis County grand jury, but lawyered his way into federal court in early 2015, where Judge Lee Yeakel dropped his charges under the clause, which grants an unimaginable amount of immunity to anybody working on a federal task force.

3) VIDEO VISITATION'S END A new law – House Bill 549 – forced in-person visitation back onto the agendas of most county jailers after half a decade spent watching most jails convert to video visitation. In September, Travis County commissioners settled on a method for funding the reestablishment. Two months later, former *Chronicle* staffer Jordan Smith uncovered a database of 70 million phone calls video visitation provider Securus had recorded without permission, stripping the Dallas company of its credence.

4) EXECUTION OF RODNEY REED

DELAYED The now-iconic death row inmate got a last-minute stay of execution after the **Texas Court of Criminal Appeals** decided it needed more time to consider newly discovered evidence that supports his claims of innocence in the murder of **Stacey Stites**. At issue, among a new set of affidavits filed in support of the 47-year-old, are arguments from forensic pathologists concluding that Stites did not die during the time frame people previously believed, and that she was moved from one location to another some time after her death.

5) RASHAD OWENS RECEIVES LIFE SENTENCE The 23-year-old Killeen resident

arrested last March after driving a car through a SXSW crowd gathered on **Red River Street**, killing four, was found guilty of capital murder in November and sentenced to life in prison.

6) THE PLOT TO KILL JULIE KOCUREK

Details are still forthcoming on the background motivation for a November attempt to assassinate State District Judge Julie Kocurek. **Chimene Onyeri** was arrested in Houston (on charges that he committed another murder) a week after the attempt on Kocurek. In mid-December, news broke that he foretold the effort to end Kocurek's life well before staking out a hiding spot near her home.

7) KELLERS' FIGHT CONTINUES In May, Frances and Dan Keller – the former child care providers who spent 21 years (of a 48-year sentence) in prison for sexual assault of a minor before eventually getting freed when a doctor confessed to having provided a false testimony – were unanimously granted relief from the **Texas Court of Criminal Appeals**. However, the CCA declined to rule on their actual innocence, leaving pro bono attorney **Keith Hampton** with a daunting task: show proof of innocence for something that never happened. In June, a first plea to the CCA to grant the Kellers' innocence proved unsuccessful.

8) FIFTH OF JULY MURDER AND OFFICIAL SUICIDE An early morning stop at the Omni Hotel for an airport run ended up ending Yellow Cab driver **Conrado Contreras**' life when he stepped into the path of 35-year-old **Michael Holt** and his rifle. Holt, who rented a desk at startup incubator Capital Factory, which takes up residence at the Omni, was shot and killed minutes later by police.

9) A SHORTAGE OF DEATH JUICE The recurring issue of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice running out of pentobarbi-

tal – a sedative TDCJ uses in conjunction with other drugs for executions – came to a head this year, as manufacturers continued to stop selling the drug to states that practice capital punishment. Not surprisingly, Texas officials found some more supply somewhere. Also not surprisingly, they've been tight-lipped on their source.

10) A JAYWALKING TO REMEMBER What should have been a simple detainment for jaywalking Downtown shortly after the bars closed on a Thursday evening in November quickly turned into a social-media scandal that reinforced beliefs that Downtown cops are too quick to get tough on casual ordinance offenders. Video from the arrest of Matthew Wallace, Jeremy King, and Lourdes Glen spread around the Internet through the weekend. None of the three ended up facing any charges.

TOP 10 LABOR STORIES by Amy Kamp

1) NO IMMIGRATION REFORM IN SIGHT 2015 saw the continuation of the battle to block the reforms President Barack Obama announced late in 2014, which would have allowed millions of **undocumented immigrants** to begin the process of applying for citizenship. Without that opportunity, thousands of Austinites are in the position of not being able to work legally, leaving them at

being able to work legally, leaving them at risk for being taken advantage of by unscrupulous employers.2) CITY INCREASES ITS LIVING WAGE

During the 2016 budget approval process, Council raised the **minimum wage for city employees** from \$11.39/hour to \$13.03. State law prevents municipal governments from enacting laws raising wages citywide, but if nothing else, raising the wages paid to city employees sets an example. Later in the year, a loophole that allowed city subcontractors to pay less was closed.

3) FAIR CHANCE PROGRESSES Council Member **Greg Casar**'s proposal to "**Ban the Box**," i.e., remove the question of whether a job applicant has a criminal record from initial job applications, hasn't made its way to the full Council yet, but it did get out of committee this year. Regardless of whether the ordinance passes, and in what form, Casar and the advocates who worked on the proposal deserve credit for starting a conversation about employment opportunities for the formerly incarcerated.

4) THE RISE OF THE GIG ECONOMY Thus far largely absent from the debate raging over **TNCs** in Austin is what companies like Uber, Lyft, Favor, etc., mean for workers. In general, these companies have strenuously fought the designation of "employer," preferring to see themselves as conduits for independent contractors (who aren't entitled to things like minimum wage or overtime). While there's been a little discussion of it here, it bears watching what happens in places like California, where some drivers have been held to be, in fact, employees.

5) WAGE GAP REMAINS Credit is due to the Austin American-Statesman for digging deep into city records to discover a continuing disparity in pay between male and female city employees. It's not, the Statesman discovered, that women are being paid less to do the same jobs as men, but that they're not being given the chance to do those higher paying jobs: "Nearly 70 percent of the city's fulltime workers are men, and 63 percent of the city's upper management is male" ("The Gender Divide," Nov. 19, Austin American-Statesman).

6) THE MESS AT EMS Chase Hoffberger's May cover story about working conditions at Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services revealed that medics are overworked, understaffed, and often at a breaking point.

7) DEVELOPERS CONTINUE TO LACK ACCOUNTABILITY The June 29 death of Ramiro Loa, a construction worker at the Eastside Station Apartments, highlighted the unfortunate fact that Austin's real estate boom comes with a human cost. Unenforced safety standards on construction sites lead to unnecessary injuries. In the worst case, as with Loa, they're fatal.

8) WORKING LOCAL A campaign by a group of Wheatsville Co-op employees in the spring highlighted the fact that buying local doesn't always guarantee that the people who work there will be compensated any better than anywhere else. The employees were frustrated by a starting wage of \$9.50/hour, and believed that GM **Dan Gillotte**'s salary was too high in comparison. Although the management initially appeared defensive about the employees' demands, later in the year, Wheatsville very quietly raised its base pay.

9) FAST FOOD FIGHT Although neither the Fight for \$15 nor the Fair Food Alliance's campaign to convince Wendy's to join its Fair Food Program for farmworkers have made as much of an impact here as they did nationally, the engagement they did get was passionate. It will be interesting to see if those small bases grow into something more significant here in Austin in 2016.

10) AFFORDABILITY LAGS Making it all the more difficult to work in Austin is the lack of **affordable housing**. Even the city's \$13.03 minimum doesn't mean a living wage in a market like this one.

RIDESHARING WORKS

Over the last 18 months, ridesharing has changed the way Austin gets around.

Over **10,000** local drivers for rideshare services like Uber and Lyft have given their fellow Austinites **millions** of rides.

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Even though **the ridesharing laws in effect since 2014 have broadly benefited Austin**, the City Council recently voted to adopt extensive new regulations that will lead services like Uber and Lyft to shut down.

That's why we want to give you a chance to cast a different vote.

We're a coalition of community groups including Austin Music People, ATX Safer Streets and TechNet, with support from rideshare companies and users.

We've launched a citizen petition drive to ask the City Council to **preserve the 2014 regulations that have allowed ridesharing to thrive in Austin.**




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TOP 10 EDUCATION STORIES by Richard Whittaker

1) GOODBYE NCLB, HELLO ESSA The U.S. Department of Education will take more of a backseat in education policy, with the signing by Pres. Barack Obama in December of the Every Student Succeeds Act. The bill, which hands more powers back to the states, is the final death knell for the expiring and unloved No Child Left Behind.

2) EMPTY COFFERS, AGAIN It's been over a year since Judge John Dietz told lawmakers that Texas public schools are underfinanced, and yet they still refused to add any serious additional cash to public education. Now the final decision lies with the **Texas Supreme Court**, and many legislators expect they will demand immediate action, requiring a special session in 2016.

3) GUNNING FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

Students don't want them. Academics and administrators don't want them. Cops don't want them. Hell, even UT System Chancellor Bill McRaven, the retired U.S. admiral who oversaw the assassination of Osama bin Laden, doesn't want them. But the NRA and every pandering politician wants guns on campus, so the Legislature approved it, and Attorney General Ken Paxton has issued an opinion that would essentially make gun-free zones a thing of the past.

4) BAD IDEAS DEFEATED Education advocates were terrified that, with Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick running the Senate, every backdoor privatization tool pushed by the education reform movement would get passed. But from vouchers to more funding diverted to private charters, they were all rejected with bipartisan opposition.

5) PEARSON EJECTED For 30 years, Pearson **Education** has run the ever-growing testing regime in Texas schools. This year, the Texas Education Agency broke their monopoly stranglehold, handing the bulk of the next four-year contract to rival Educational Testing Service. State Board of Education Vice Chair Thomas Ratliff warned that the change doesn't matter, because opponents of high-stakes testing are "vendor agnostic" in their concerns.

6) SHAKE-UP ON SIXTH STREET Major changes in Austin ISD. First,

Superintendent **Paul Cruz** revamped his cabinet in May, and the departure of seeming fixtures general counsel-turned-chief of staff Mel Waxler was seen as an overdue changing of the guard. Then board president Gina Hinojosa stepped down from her leadership position (while staying on as a trustee) to run to replace retiring State Rep. Elliott Naishtat. D-Austin. Her exit means a vacant seat on the Nov. 2016 ballot, and trustee infighting to replace her as president in January.

7) IDEA STILL HERE Remember when the Allan community scored a victory by pushing IDEA Public Schools out of their AISD campus? The charter operation is still here and expanding, with two campuses (Allan, whose name the group purloined for their new campus in Montopolis, and a facility on Rundberg), with one more planned for 2016.

8) NEW SCHOOL UNIFORM: FLOOD PANTS As the city of Austin still wrangles with buyouts for residents of Onion Creek, **AISD** is dealing with water damage of its own, with House Park stadium wrecked by rising water on Memorial Day, and half of Paim Elementary rendered unusable after the Halloween storms.

9) FAREWELL, LINDA Children and classroom workers lost a leading advocate in January with the sad loss of Texas American Federation of Teachers President Linda Bridges. AFT President Randi Weingarten called her "a great leader [and] a great friend."

10) DON'T STAND SO CLOSE TO ME A surge in the reported number of inappropriate and potentially illegal relationships between teachers and students was the focus of the first out-of-session hearing by the Texas Senate Education Committee. Now lawmakers are questioning whether social media makes such relationships more likely, or just more likely to be detected.

TOP 10 ENVIRONMENTAL STORIES by Michael King

1) HALLOWEEN FLOOD, REPRISE Onion Creek residents hadn't all recovered from the 2013 flood when another horror show arrived at All Hallows' – and the city's earnest but slow response on buyouts evoked more neighborhood outcry.

2) MEMORIAL DAY FLOOD, REPRISE Austin wasn't hit quite as hard in the spring (recalling the 1981 deluge), but Wimberley and elsewhere in Central Texas were heavily damaged, with loss of life.

3) IT NEVER RAINS, BUT ... The perennial fights over endangered water rights hit **Hays County**, where drilling for nearby cities threatened residential wells as well as the future of the Trinity Aquifer – new state restrictions offered temporary relief, but the fight goes on.

4) HIGHWAY FROM HELL The planners' determination to expand **MoPac South** from 10 lanes to as many as 16 (in various configurations) seemed undeterred by Austin opposition, not to mention city roads at clogged capacity and no real mass transit plan solutions.

5) CRACKS AND FISSURES Parks and Rec announced that 25 of the city's 36 **swimming pools** are leaking, several seriously – amidst other budget woes. Patched for now, awaiting permanent solutions. **6) SOLAR CITY** As prices continued to fall, Austin expanded purchases of **solar power**, adding contracts for 450 megawatts and targeting 600 MW by 2019 – a leap forward for renewables, although another natural gas plant remains under consideration.

7) CLOSED SYSTEM In what might seem like a setback, Ecology Action closed its Ninth & I-35 recycling center after more than a decade of processing myriad commodities – but it was the spread of citywide recycling that enabled the decision. The good work continues.

8) DROP THAT BAG Austin Resource Recovery reported that the two-year-old single-use bag ban dramatically reduced those bags – but multiplied **"reusable" plastic bags** that are being discarded instead of reused. Next: amendments, and a "culture change."

9) DENIALISM DON Not everybody applauded Austin's climate action plans – City Council Member **Don Zimmerman** called it a government hoax, even haranguing Texas Tech climate scientist Katharine Hayhoe at Council, because she actually knows something about the subject.

10) WE'LL ALWAYS HAVE PARIS Mayor **Steve Adler**, Council Member **Leslie Pool**, and County Commissioner **Brigid Shea** joined world leaders in a **U.N. Conference on Climate Change** that actually showed promise of concerted action against global warming: reason for hope.



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Cool Moms? 1) Jennifer Terry, 44, was charged with driving her daughter and several other minors around Riverdale, Utah, in August to facilitate their tossing eggs at 10 to 20 homes. Some damage was reported, but so far, Terry is the only one charged. 2) Mandy Wells, 32, told police that she thought "for a minute" that it was a bad idea, "but did it anyway" – she invited 10 kids (aged 12 to 14) to her home for a party and served beer and marijuana. Wells, of Springtown, Texas, said her daughter, 14, smokes marijuana because the girl (go figure!) suffers from depression.

One-Man Arsenal

According to the flabbergasted sheriff of rural Chesterfield County, S.C., "This has completely changed our definition of [what constitutes] an 'ass-load' of guns." Brent Nicholson, 51, had been storing more than 7,000 firearms (most of them likely stolen) in his home and a storage building on his property. Every room of the house was stacked with weapons, and it took four tractor-trailer trips to haul everything away, with help of 100 law-enforcement officers. Nicholson also had 500 chainsaws, at least 250 taxidermied deer, elk, and alligator heads, and more. No motive was obvious to deputies. (Nicholson would still be living in the shadows today if he hadn't run that stop sign on Oct. 21 with bogus license plates on his truck.)

Police Report

The Human Fanny Pack: Brandon Wilson, 26, was arrested in November in Cedar Rapids, Iowa – his second bust of 2015 in which a substantial number of crack cocaine "baggies" were found in his rectum. Fifty-one were recovered this time (counting the ones with marijuana), down from the 109 discovered in his February arrest. Police in November also found \$1,700 cash on him (but just in his pocket).

Leading Economic Indicators

Following the release of Apple's yearly financials in October (and based on sales of its iPhone 6), the company announced that, apart from other assets, it was sitting on \$206 billion in cash – about like owning the entire gross domestic product of Venezuela, but all in cash. Another way of expressing it: Using only its cash, Apple could buy every single NFL, NBA, MLB, and NHL team, plus the 20 most valuable international soccer teams – and still have plenty left. Or, as the BGR.com blog also pointed out, it could instead simply give every man, woman and child in America \$646 (coincidentally, about what a new iPhone 6 sells for).

Even if Armageddon doesn't happen, the CEO of the massive online retailer Overstock.com believes there is a "10 to 20 percent" chance of a world financial meltdown in the next few years, and he is arranging to be back in business in the aftermath. Patrick Byrnes told the New York Post in November he has stashed away enough food in a well-fortified facility in Utah's Granite Mountain to serve his 2,000 employees for "30 to 60 days," along with several thousand other emergency preparations and \$10 million in gold. But, he insisted, he's not a gun-toting "prepper"; the plan is only about tiding employees over until the Internet and banking systems are back up and running.

The Continuing Crisis

In November in Harare, Zimbabwe, Mison Sere, 42, was judged winner of the fourth annual "Mister Ugly" contest after showcasing his seemingly random dental arrangement (some teeth there, some not) and "wide range of grotesque facial expressions," according to an Associated Press dispatch. However, many in the crowd thought their favorite was even uglier and threatened to riot. "I am naturally ugly," said a jealous (former winner) William Masvinu; "He [Sere] is ugly only when he opens his mouth."

Wait, What?

Kuala Lumpur International Airport took out ads in two Malaysian daily newspapers in December to find the owners of three Boeing 747-200Fs parked there for months (one for at least a year) and threatening to auction them off in 14 days if not claimed. Two are white, and one is "off-white" (if the reader is checking his inventory). The planes' last listed owner said it sold them in 2008.

TOP 10 (+1) THEATRE RICHES OF 2015 by Robert Faires

▶ 1) THR3E ZISTERS (Salvage Vanguard Theater) In Lola Pierson's irreverent take on Chekhov, those siblings pining for Moscow became the Waiting Dead, disinterred for one more replay of their sad tale. But they were never more lively (or deadly) than in SVT's staging. The biting script was charged with a wild theatrical energy by the rolling wall of la Ensterä's set and Yury Urnov's direction, and the performances, kicked off with sublime mime from Robert Matney, were to die for.

2) REFUGIA (UT Dept. of Theatre & Dance) Devised by Minneapolis-based the Moving Company with UT students, this meditation on humanity in transit gave a bracing global tour, with stops that included a Soviet train depot, a Midwestern nursing home, and a magical library. Driven by the masterful performances of the guest artists, this poignant, comic work moved and was moving.

3) *KISS ME KATE* (Texas State University Dept. of Theatre & Dance) Cole Porter's saucy showbiz riff on *Taming of the Shrew* became a rafter-shaking shindig in harlequin tights as ace choreographer-director Cassie Abate put her students through their paces. The cast's handling of the script's raucous comedy and Porter's sly tunes delighted, as did Michael Raiford's eye-popping designs.

4) TORTOISE & HARE (Summer Stock Austin) In their reinvention of Aesop's fable, Allen Robertson and Damon Brown created an original musical for Summer Stock even more joyous and affecting than 2014's Stone Soup. Lessons about friendship, community, sacrifice, gender roles, and the environment were served up with rap, catchy tunes, and the humor and heart of a Pixar film.

5) *HUNGER* (Vortex Repertory Company) Ebony Stewart brought all the fire and fearlessness that's made her a legend in spoken-word circles to this solo show about her own pain and healing. As intensely personal and richly written a show as I saw, its artfully chosen words delivered with spellbinding force. 6) EVERYTHING IS ESTABLISHED (Physical Plant Theater) Just to see gifted actors Lee Eddy, Jeffery Mills, and Michael Joplin play off one another was a joy, but to see them play strange games and lose their identities to an absent master in Hannah Kenah's Beckettian

fling was both a joy and unnerving. **7) CENICIENTA (Zach Theatre/Teatro Vivo)** Just a girl alone in a basement acting out the Cinderella story, but the playing of it was pure enchantment, thanks to the charm of Rupert Reyes' script; the clever, witty use of household objects as puppets by Caroline Reck; and the vivacity of actor Gricelda Silva, who brings to every role a magic all her own.

8) THE CHRISTIANS (Hyde Park Theatre)

That rare play that puts a crisis of faith center stage and treats believers with compassion, Lucas Hnath's drama of a megachurch minister causing a seismic rift in his congregation is remarkable, and HPT staged it with a sensitivity that touched heart and spirit.

9) THE STRANGERER (Capital T Theatre) For whatever bizarre impulse led playwright Mickle Maher to mash up Albert Camus and the 2004 presidential race, we're grateful. It served up a feast of provocative political satire and, in this staging, the perverse glee of watching Robert Pierson's spoton W implode.

10) *MR. BURNS, A POST-ELECTRIC PLAY* (Mary Moody Northen Theatre) Dystopian futures are yesterday's news, but this one, in which *The Simpsons* goes from pop-cult touchstone to primal myth, offered a fresh view of the power of stories. Animated by a fine cast and Tara Cooper's exquisite *Simpsons* masks.



11) THE HISTORY OF KING LEAR (Hidden Room Theatre) Nahum Tate's notorious rewrite of the Bard (*Lear* ends happily!) was revived with respect by Beth Burns and a production team whose fidelity to Restoration presentation made this take on the familiar tale sumptuous and surprisingly appealing.

TOP 10 DANCE/CLASSICAL MUSIC TREASURES OF 2015 by Robert Faires



▲ 1) MIRÓ QUARTET (UT Butler School of Music) The precarious ride that is Schubert's String Quartet No. 15 in G Major, with its hairpin turns of emotion and mood, was handled so smoothly and with such joy by this everamazing group that I felt I was in a perfectly tuned Porsche with an expert hand at the wheel: nary a bump, just power and passion at 9,000 rpms.

2) SEASON OF INNOCENCE (Ballet Austin II) *The Crucible* in all its pained, paranoiac fury, but without words – just the eloquence of Nick Kepley's intense, agonized movement and Steve Parker's tension-ratcheting music. I've never felt so close to the torment and tragedy of Salem.

3) THE POET SINGS: EMILY DICKINSON (Conspirare) In 32 settings of Dickinson

poems, soprano Sonja DuToit Tengblad, tenor Eric Neuville, and pianist Michelle Schumann channeled the unique exuberance and mystery of this writer with an intimacy that put us in her parlor, with her whispering in our ears.

4) MEDIEVAL PILGRIMAGE IN IBERIA (Texas Early Music Project) The gratitude and joy in this concert of songs honoring the Virgin Mary, St. James, and God's creation was infectious, and made all the more so by stellar musicianship from the instrumentalists and divine vocals by a female choir.

5) HOW LITTLE YOU ARE (Austin Classical Guitar/Conspirare/Texas Performing Arts) Twelve guitars, embodying nature in all its beauty and cruelty, and scores of singers representing settlers of the American West – awestruck, grief-stricken, and lonesome past description – forged a riveting tension in this haunting premiere by composer Nico Muhly.

6) THE TREES OF GOVALLE (Forklift

Danceworks) Seeing a tree get planted was the most moving dance moment of 2015 for me. As workers from the city's Urban Forestry Division showed how they keep Austin's trees thriving and Eastside residents shared memories of Govalle Park, my connection to a neighborhood's life and to nature deepened.

7) *AIDA* (Austin Opera) The pageantry was striking, but the deepest impressions in this staging of Verdi's tragedy came from the personal moments with Karen Slack's despairing Aida, Issachah Savage's conflicted Radamès, and Tuija Knihtilä's haughty Amneris.

8) TRUE STORY (Kathy Dunn Hamrick Dance Company) Screen doors took on a Proustian resonance as dancers entered and exited through them, their transparency and old-timey creak and slam recalling past times at beaches, camps, grandparents' homes, where one discovered individual freedom and bonded with others.

9) THE LODGER (Austin Classical Guitar)

Pre-talkies Hitchcock given fresh tension by Joseph V. Williams II's score for four guitars and cello. The eerie sounds and suspense crafted by the Texas Guitar Quartet and Bion Tsang, playing for 90 minutes straight, would have made the Master smile.

10) TRAFFIC JAM (Fusebox Festival) Steve Parker's concert of mobility-inspired music was just inspired, repeatedly sounding notes of wonder with trombones blaring from pedicabs, percussionists drumming on car parts, and a symphony of 80 car horns, flashing hazard lights, and moving windshield wipers.



TOP 10 ARTS-RELATED PROGRAM ACTIVITIES | ENGAGED WITH IN 2015 by Wayne Alan Brenner



▲ 1) SHAWN CAMP'S "APHOTIC ZONE" (Northern-Southern) The "Swimming" group exhibition at Phillip Niemeyer's Koenig Lane arts space was sufficient unto itself, but also contained this separate room of abstract paintingson-Plexiglas that, via cycling illumination, transmogrified Camp's usual precise brilliance to *completely different, back-lit* vistas like pieces of frozen aurora borealis. 2) YEAR OF THE ROOSTER (Capital T Theatre) The entire cast of this staging of Eric Dufault's comedy of machismo gone troppo was spot-on as directed by Mark Pickell (on a stunning set he designed himself), but it was Jason Liebrecht's pec-twitching turn as the titular cock that made this production stand head and feathers above most of the year's theatre.

3) EVERYTHING IS ESTABLISHED (Physical Plant Theater) When the

(Physical Plant Theater) When the script is written and directed by Hannah Kenah and performed by Lee Eddy, Michael Joplin, and Jeffery Mills for Physical Plant at the Off Center, an audience can – when not laughing their asses off at the absurd, character-driven hijinks and *Looney Tunes*-level physical comedy onstage – be almost smug about the quality of original work fully created in the ATX.

4) MR. BURNS, A POST-ELECTRIC PLAY (Mary Moody Northen Theatre) Just as one might Cassandra an apocalypse, we saw this thing coming from miles away. And now understand how fortunate we are that Anne Washburn's dark musical ode to theatre, culture, memory, and (especially) *The Simpsons* was produced at St. Edward's under the direction of David Long.

5) "HOLLIS HAMMONDS: BLANKET OF FOG" (Women & Their Work) W&TW's

entire gallery was turned over to this talented Hammonds, who used it to reconstruct – with wall-sized drawings, with video projections, with complex sculpture in the center of the space – what happened to the structure of her childhood home (and the subsequent structure of her memories) when that building burned down a week after her 15th birthday.

6) NONOTAK (POP Austin:

Illumination) The follow-up to POP Austin's inaugural high-end art exhibition had already proved canny by its focus on light-generated and light-generating creations before Noemi Schipfer and Takami Nakamoto, the light-and-sound-manipulating DJs of NONOTAK, activated their virtual performance cage and warped beats and beams to eye-jarring, body-rocking intensity like something out of a Paul Pope clubkid future.

7) THE HISTORY OF KING LEAR (Hidden Room Theatre) Beth Burns and her Hidden Room performers (as dedicated as they are talented, and they're way fucking talented) took an obscure, Restoration version of Shakespeare's tragedy and rendered the romantically enhanced narrative and its complex gestural language into an unforgettable spectacle of power games and passion.

8) "NATALIE FRANK: THE BROTHERS GRIMM" (Blanton Museum of Art)

The Blanton brought Austin native Frank home briefly from NYC with this exhibition of gouache-and-pastel works that depict grisly and gruesome scenes from the Grimms' compilation of ancient fairy tales, turning several rooms of the venue's upstairs gallery into a sort of symbol-rich, staggered mescaline trip through the human psyche.

9) "ALICE'S ADVENTURES IN WONDER-LAND" (Harry Ransom Center) The HRC contains a mother lode in so many areas of the arts, especially world literature, and when its bosses choose to fea-

ture a subject as popular as Lewis Carroll's classic and its cultural impact, boy howdy, do they provide a Scrooge McDuck wealth of diversity and goodness for the public to feed its head with.

10) TERRY MAKER'S "HOLY FOOL" (grayDUCK Gallery) This Coloradobased artist "uses a variety of commonplace, discarded, domestic objects combined with traditional art-making materials to compose sculptural forms ... to reveal the 'guts' or the polished veneer of the matter." Sound ordinary enough? Wrong: Maker's sculptural forms are often as extraordinary as your most bizarre dreams – and painstakingly crafted, as in this show.

3) CAMIBAart, FLATBED PRESS, GALLERY SHOAL CREEK, PHOTO MÉTHODE, and anyone else at 2832 E. MLK. Increased density, increased gravity.

4) grayDUCK GALLERY is taking bold moves away from an expired credo of exhibiting art that anyone can afford, to that priced at a level that can support an artist. The quality has followed suit.

5) LORA REYNOLDS GALLERY has a long history of bringing acclaimed artists to the city that few other galleries in town have the resources to court.

6) MASS GALLERY's worth is half due to its exhibitions and half to the contributions the collective's individual members make to the scene.

7) MUSEUM OF HUMAN ACHIEVEMENT is still doing its thing: superb and wildly varied, irreverent programming.



8) **PUMP PROJECT** continues to claim studio refugees from relentless gentrification. That buzzing inertia is matched only by its exhibitions.

9) testsite bridged the museum and gallery scenes this year by handing over curation to elites from both the Contemporary Austin and the Blanton Museum of Art.

10) WOMEN & THEIR WORK is a constant reminder and showcase of art that is still greatly marginalized by a supposedly enlightened sector.

One for the Books

Our favorite reads of 2015

UNCOMMON WOMEN

This is dedicated to the one(s) I love ... but, due to time and space constraints, did not get to give a shout-out to in 2015.

Paula McLain's second work of historical fiction - her follow-up to The Paris Wife - is one of those rare finds that immediately begs to be re-read. The lovely language of

Circling the Sun (Ballantine) unfurls the story of Beryl Markham, the first woman to fly solo, east to west, across the Atlantic and the first licensed female racehorse trainer in Kenva. Born in 1902 Britain, raised by her father in Kenya, she was also one-third of a fascinating love triangle with Denys Finch Hatton and Karen Blixen (who, under the pen name Isak Dinesen, wrote Out of Africa), and there the novel finds its page-turning, remarkable core. Women can

be wildly successful and fall in love, remember?

Next up, Edwidge Danticat (Breath, Eyes, Memory; The Farming of Bones) published her third YA novel, Untwine (Scholastic), a poignant story of twin sisters separated by a tragic car accident. The surviving girl's journey through grief sticks in the mind's eye for quite some time.

Adrienne Celt's first novel, The Daughters (Liveright), is a haunting, musical tale that weaves four generations of women together in operatic beauty.

Sarai Walker's debut, Dietland (Houghton Mifflin Harcourt), came highly and frequently recommended (Jennifer Weiner included), but




for some strange reason hasn't yet shot through the stratosphere. Once Plum Kettle's story takes a foreshadowed turn, her lonely life as an overweight replier to fan mail at a girls' magazine becomes entwined with a gripping (read: totally bonkers!) story of revolution, one hell-bent on blowing the lid off beauty standards and gender inequality in a razor-sharp and unapologetically bold feminist battle cry. Elephant in the Dark (Scholastic), a beautifully illustrated, kid-friendly retelling of Rumi's "The Three Blind Men and the Elephant" by Mina Javaherbin and artist Eugene Yelchin. Finding our truths and recognizing perspective are imperative for readers of all ages. Jessi Cape



LONE STAR STATE OF MIND

In my favorite 2015 read, Joe Lansdale takes on the mythically true-ish story of Nat Love, an African-American marksman nicknamed Deadwood Dick who was both a marshal and a Buffalo Soldier. Along the novel's picaresque journey, Love is tracked by a racist killer seeking revenge. Paradise Sky (Mulholland Books), like Lansdale's equally fine 2013 novel The Thicket, channels Mark Twain, It's fun, beautifully written, and, most important, captures a neglected piece of the American puzzle. Charles Baxter is known as a writer's writer. His collection There's Something I Want You to Do cements that rep with stories divided into virtues and vices. The story "Loyalty" shines the brightest with its abandoned hus-

band coming to the aid of his crazed ex-wife. Baxter's tales are elegant gems of humanity. Austinite Elizabeth Harris' novel Mayhem reverberates around a castration done in anger after a potential rape in rural 1936 Texas. The fine prose echoes Katherine Anne Porter in its sense of place.

Gary Cartwright's memoir The Best I Recall (UT Press) was my favorite nonfiction work of 2015. It follows Cartwright's career from Sixties Dallas/Ft. Worth, reporting sports alongside Bud Shrake, Blackie Sherrod, and Dan Jenkins, to drug-addled Seventies Austin and his days at Texas Monthly. But his honest take on the losses of late life make this book truly a keeper.

Amanda Eyre Ward's novel of the migrant journey, The Same Sky (Ballantine), is the most important book to come out of Austin this year. Debra Monroe's blue-collar-to-academia memoir My Unsentimental Education (University of Georgia Press) is as wellwritten as it is wise. Jesse Sublett gets wonderfully gritty in his true-crime book 1960s Austin Gangsters: Organized Crime That Rocked the Capital (Arcadia Publishing). Former Austinite Dao Strom mixes music and memoir in the lyrical We Were Meant to Be a Gentle People (MPMP), a book/album examining memory and identity. I just read Elizabeth McCracken's masterful 2014 collection, Thunderstruck and Other Stories (Dial Press). You should too. - Joe O'Connell

1) The Theater of War: What Ancient Greek

Tragedies Can Teach Us Today by Bryan Doerries (Knopf), chronicles the author's work with war veterans, prison workers, and other PTSD victims using Greek tragedies authored by Aeschylus and Sophocles – both war vets who had seen best friends ripped apart on the battlefield.

the Greek classics. Both are recommended. 3) War Music: An Account

of Homer's Iliad by Christopher Logue (Farrar, Straus and Giroux) is one hell of a book/poem. Reading it now, saying "wow" a lot.


4) H is for Hawk by Helen Macdonald (Grove), a memoir of a daughter's grief and a bird, seems to have swooped

down and stolen everyone's heart. Nice work if you can get it.

5) The Berlin series (City of Stones, City of Smoke, and City of Light) by graphic novelist Jason Lutes (Drawn & Ouarterly) is set in the waning days of the Weimar Republic, just before Hitler takes over. Chapters 17-19 were issued in comic-book format in 2015; the final compilation volume, Berlin: City of Light, is expected in late 2016. Great, great stuff.

6) A Better Goodbye by John Schulian (Tyrus) is the first crime novel by Schulian, author of some of the best writing about boxing ever. Just got it and expect to be floored.

7) The Roses Underneath by C.F. Yetmen (Ypsilon & Co.) is a novel of Germany just after the end of World War II. told from the survivors' POV. Yetmen, who

9) Red Harvest by Dashiell Hammett knocked me out when I re-read it, in sequence with every other Hammett novel this summer. Hammett's


Nearly the first quarter of my reading year was taken up with Jamaican novelist Marlon James' gargantuan epic A Brief History of Seven Killings (Riverhead). Released at the end of 2014 and named the winner of this year's coveted Man Booker Prize, it is a complicated, harrowing, violent tale centered around the attempted assassination of Bob Marley in December 1976, an act with ramifications that extend into the NYC drug wars of later decades. Dickensian in its scope and huge cast of characters, many of whom speak Jamaican patois, it's an intense, exhausting, but ultimately exhilarating read.

Traveling this summer in Morocco and last summer in Turkey has naturally piqued my interest in the Muslim world. Two novels from this year were certainly pertinent to current events. Submission (Farrar, Straus and Giroux), by controversial French writer Michel Houellebecq (just published stateside, translated

by Lorin Stein), is the timely tale of what happens when the Muslim Brotherhood wins the French election in the near future. Insightful, dark, and very funny, it is interpreted from the viewpoint of an emotionally disenfranchised university professor. Highly recommended to political junkies. Also generating controversy upon its original publication in Algeria is The Meursault Investigation (Other Press), by journalist Kamel Daoud (translated by John Cullen). He cleverly revisits Albert Camus' 1942 existential masterpiece The Stranger, this time through the eyes of the brother of the heretofore nameless Arab murdered by Camus' antihero Meursault. Daoud addresses the legacy of colonialism and, by extension, the current state of Arab identity.

Two Austin-centric books of note are Scott Blackwood's See How Small (Little, Brown and Company) and Jesse Sublett's 1960s Austin Gangsters: Organized Crime That Rocked the Capital (Arcadia Publishing). The former is a rather unsettling fictional account of the stillunsolved 1991 yogurt shop murders. The latter is the lively, noirish, and well-researched story of the largely forgotten Timmy Overton Gang and the Dixie Mafia that ran wild 50 years ago. - Jay Trachtenberg



"Shakespeare in Print and Performance" celebrates the Bard with rare artifacts from the Ransom Center's holdings

With the 400th anniversary of William Shakespeare's death mere months away (April 23, 2016 - mark those calendars!), arts institutions worldwide are devoting even more attention to the dramatist now than usual. The University of Texas' Harry Ransom Center is among them, using the occasion to spotlight some of the lesser known - and certainly lesser seen - holdings from its rare book and theatre arts collections. Who knew the HRC even owned John Wilkes Booth's promptbook for Richard III? And yet here it is, part of the curious miscellany of literary and theatrical artifacts in the exhibition "Shakespeare in Print and Performance."

The title should tip you off that the HRC's focus here isn't on the author so much as on his legacy, and it also reveals something of the exhibition's split personality. On the one hand is "Shakespeare in Print," consisting almost wholly of historic copies of printed works in display cases. On the other is "Shakespeare in Performance," a more expansive display of items involved in staging the author's work, primarily in the 19th and 20th

centuries: promptbooks for actors and stage managers, painted

costume and set renderings, photos and film from productions of note. The former is all about the text and requires a close reading

industry in the 16th and 17th centuries, and how it affected both Shakespeare's career and later generations' understandings of his plays. The latter is much more into visuals, letting images from various productions illustrate how interpretations of Shakespeare's dramas have changed over time. It's as basic as the difference between a book and a play, between learning about Shakespeare in a classroom and in a theatre.

to obtain the full flavor of the English printing

The thrill of "Shakespeare in Print" stems from the sense of proximity it gives us to the author and his world. Looking at books that mention Shakespeare and were printed while he lived is akin to looking at a newspaper from the past: Through this surviving artifact, we feel a connection across time. And the curators establish how unformed the trades of playwright and publisher were in

that era. The former were writing scripts for immediate consumption rather than literary posterity, revising them from one run to the next, collaborating with other writers without credit.

The latter, meanwhile, were cobbling together plays to print from

handwritten manuscripts, Harry Ransom Center, 21st & Guadalupe, UT campus promptbooks, and what

actors remembered of their lines, and with spelling and punctuation not standardized, room for variations in texts was huge. Just



seeing how that flesh that Hamlet desires to melt goes from being printed as "sallied" (or is it "sullied"?) to "solid" conveys what a rough-and-tumble, make-it-up-as-vou-go-along frontier Shakespeare worked in.

By contrast, the world of "Shakespeare in Performance" is one in which the Bard's monumental stature is established, and theatre artists are striving to stage his plays with an artistic vision as grand or profound as his. Whether the look is of elaborate ornamentation and historical authenticity or modernist simplicity and primal power, the impulse behind them is the same: to create a world onstage as compelling as the one the playwright put on the page. And several examples here achieve that aim: The bold King Lear designs by Norman Bel Geddes and the lushly fantastic Midsummer Night's Dream by Max Reinhardt are epic enough to lose yourself in - and you may find yourself wishing you could, in a live performance. The drawback to this part of the exhibition - indeed, to any museum exhibition related to Shakespeare -

is that it can carry you only to the edge of a full Shakespearean experience. To get all the way there, you need to hear his words spoken, see his characters live, follow them on their journeys. To the HRC's credit, it's trying to bridge that gap with assorted live readings and screenings of Shakespeare's works, so check its calendar of events.

Even so, "Shakespeare in Print and Performance" may leave you wanting more. Unlike Ransom Center shows such as "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland" and "The Making of Gone With the Wind," this exhibit isn't driven by one overarching vision or narrative. Its dual nature and the very different ways in which its two parts tell their stories make it tough for them to connect or cohere, especially given the smaller space they have to work with. The curatorial team (on which, full disclosure, my daughter Rosalind worked) has assembled a number of fascinating items here that offer tantalizing glimpses into the career and legacy of our Will. It's just that we know there's so much more to see.





"ROBERT JACKSON HARRINGTON & HECTOR HERNANDEZ: IMPOSSIBLE TO TELL" grayDUCK Gallery, 2213 E. Cesar Chavez www.grayduckgallery.com Through Jan. 10

This is the perfect weekend to see Robert Jackson Harrington and Hector Hernandez's "Impossible to Tell." While we're still nursing the hangover from our annual Christmas consumerist binge (and another kind of hangover from New Year's Eve), and as we enter 2016 with all the unfounded hopes for a better cycle. the atmosphere of this exhibition makes the most sense. The brightly colored photographs and assemblage sculpture built from mostly newly purchased tools and other items (some still with price tags) invoke a quintessentially American air of victory and pride. Here, though, that patriotism takes a strange form with tokens of low-level labor (think mop heads and utility lights) and a color palette deeply informed by current marketing strategy. Even without the American flags poking out the back of several sculptures like battle banners, few could miss the unspoken chant of "USA, USA" filling the gallery, or maybe just simply, "'Merica!"

In this exhibition, the aesthetics of currentday labor and manufacturing are torn from their contexts of utility and veer surprisingly pop: harshly saturated, high-visibility oranges, pinks, and greens, coupled with vacuformed glossy plastic casings, shrink wraps, and graphic-heavy cardboards. It's far from the monochromed, oil-stained images of industry found in our collective memory, but a much more accurate depiction of the current state of things, that is, the defusing of simple, childlike marketing strategies toward an increasingly broad do-ityourself demographic, a demographic previously dominated by unadulterated machismo.

Both artists stick to their own patterns quite closely, but of the two, Harrington seems to take greater risks, testing his limits and creating works that, though consistent in style, vary considerably in scale and form. Hernandez's practice is more narrow and risks coming across as following the same recipe ad infinitum (stage a model in brightly colored tights in the center of the composition in an industrial environment, hide the upper body and head with a whimsical, brightly colored constructed shape or cloth, photograph, repeat). The strongest of his works move furthest away from that formula, such as *Never the Machine Forever*, in which the model is altered in a more thorough and interesting way, or *Sun Shower* with its painted-over graffiti in the background, building a dynamic composition and layered concept.

The best works in the show, however, are collaborative, a fact that makes sense in light of the two artists' frequent curatorial endeavors as members of artist collective Los Outsiders - their greatest strengths come from unity and working with other creatives. These collaborative works tie Harrington's machinelike sculptures and material eccentricity to Hernandez's ability to animate unique characters and focus the viewer's attention. In this way, photographs become more engaging with additional beguiling props and collage added to the standard mix. On the other side, the largest assembled sculptures become oddly human, like worker robots ready to colonize (and maybe destroy) whatever's put in front of them.

Potential energies of all sorts dominate the show, from the optimistic USA hurrah founded more on what could be than what has been to direct physical manifestations. Hernandez's figures are frequently caught in midstep, and Harrington's constructions are in some instances even plugged into wall sockets without practical reason. Even the placement of works precariously close to the pedestals' edge helps to build that energy. This conjured sense of suspended action and anticipation is a unique success of the exhibition and one worth spending time with – even through the sharp soberness of the first day of the year.

1) Aztex go pro. After a wildly successful three seasons in the amateur Premier Development League – a championship, a league-best record, and 13 players, several of them local, picked up by MLS teams – the Austin Aztex made the longawaited jump to pro status this year.

2) Aztex go dark. After a difficult season on and off the field, the Aztex announced in October that they would not have a team in 2016. They vow to return in 2017 with a new, soccer-specific stadium, but meanwhile, San Antonio appears to have grabbed the inside track in the race to bring Major League Soccer to Central Texas, as...

3) San Antonio Spurs push out Scorpions. Spurs Sports & Entertainment reached an agreement in December to operate a USL team at Toyota Field in 2016, after the city of San Antonio and Bexar County bought the stadium from the owner of the NASL San Antonio Scorpions for \$18 million.

4) Abby Smith sets a new UT shutout record. The Longhorns' senior goalkeeper started the year with the U.S. U-23 national team, ended it with her 30th career shutout, and even scored the Horns' first goal of the season – for the second season in a row. She'll be missed.

5) Three Austin-area high school teams make it to the state championship game. The Vandegrift High girls, Liberty Hill boys, and Georgetown East View boys each lost in the final.

6) The FIFA corruption scandal blows up, with some 23 FIFA executives arrested in pre-dawn raids on a luxury hotel in Zurich in May and December, accused of a "24-year scheme to enrich themselves through the corruption of international soccer" to the tune of \$150 million in bribes and kickbacks. At this point, more than two-thirds of the people who voted to award the next two World Cups to Russia and Qatar have been arrested or indicted.



The House Park flood in May was a big factor in the Austin Aztex's up and (way) down year.

7) The U.S. Women win the World Cup, getting better with each game, and capping it with a memorable, celebratory, five-goal romp over defending champ Japan in the final.

8) U.S. Men up and mostly down. Beating the Netherlands and Germany on the road was cool, but when it came to games that mattered, the Gold Cup was a fiasco, followed by a home loss to archrival Mexico with a spot in the Olympics on the line.

9) Hope Solo was suspended from the U.S. National Team, after an incident at the U.S. training camp when her husband, former NFL player Jerramy Stevens (with whom she was involved in a domestic abuse incident the night before their wedding) was busted for DUI after the pair commandeered a team van without permission.

10) A couple of feel-good stories to end the year: Abby Wambach retired from international soccer as the top goal-scorer of all time, man or woman. Great career, great farewell speech; look it up. 

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FOP 10 BEE'S KNEES

by Jessi Cape

1) APIS In its first year of operation, the restaurant and apiary overlooking the Pedernales River won our

hearts with impeccable honeycomb decor and local, seasonal ingredients fashioned in classically creative dishes and cocktails.

2) TWO HIVES HONEY Specializing in all-natural, raw, and unfiltered honey products harvested from neighborhood micro-apiaries around town, this 2015 Austin Food & Wine Alliance grant recipient offers a chance for novices to house two fully maintained hives while honing beekeeping skills.

3) THE AUSTIN AREA BEEKEEPERS ASSOC-IATION Their sold-out 2015 annual conference at Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center offered 15 expert-taught classes, ranging in skill level and topical interests. Tickets are still available for the fifth annual event, January 16, at the J.J. Pickle Research Campus.

4) BEE FRIENDLY AUSTIN Tanya and Chuck Phillips operate a Certified Naturally Grown apiary with on-site small-scale beekeeping classes in Southwest Austin.

5) CROWNFOX FARMS Sarah King and Deano Jones' 20-acre East Austin organic bee farm is a nationally Certified Wildlife Habitat specializing in small batches and the rehabilitation of aggressive bees. The duo is campaigning through Indiegogo for help with an imperative irrigation project.

6) AUSTIN BEES Brandon Fehrenkamp is a longtime advocate working tirelessly to rescue and rehabilitate feral bees, and his Facebook page acts as a fascinating hub of beekeeping news.

7) MERIDIAN HIVE MEADERY This local mead brewery (and another 2015 AFWA grant-winner) purveys several kinds of artisan honey wines around town, and they're working on a tasting room. Try the blackberry Rhapsody this season.

8) AMERICAN HONEY BEE PROTECTION AGENCY Walter Schumacher's organization cultivates a bee-friendly culture through awareness with on-site apiaries at area schools, business rooftop hives, a Travis County corrections inmate program, and proactive bee preventative abatement with partners like P. Terry's Burger Stand.

9) LONE STAR – AFRICA WORKS In 2015, this local nonprofit partnered with beekeepers in South Sudan to send their young country's first export to the USA: natural honey. The sales (a work in progress, in partnership with AHBPA) serve to boost community rebuilding efforts after civil war with 8.5 acres of cultivated land for next year's hives and harvest.

10) BEE SWEET LEMONADE Mikaila Ulmer, age 10, paired saving bees with her grandma's flaxseed lemonade recipe. After a *Shark Tank* appearance, her bottles are sold at Whole Foods around the country, with a portion of proceeds donated to Heifer International, the Texas Beekeepers Association, and the Sustainable Food Center.

What the hell happened in the Austin food scene in 2015? Even those of us deep in the trenches, a gossipy bunch for sure, might have trouble answering. It was another year of national interest, of nice guys finishing first (at least when it comes to the James Beard Awards), of restaurant expansion far beyond I-35. But those moments of triumph couldn't mask the nervousness as solid con-

cepts shuttered, chefs hung up their hats, and new eateries were welcomed with little more than a sigh. But for all the uncertainty in culinary ATX, we still found plenty – both old and new – to inspire us, to delight us, and to applaud. Maybe it's a difficult adolescence, but we are looking forward to the next wave of rebellion. It's still our town – zits and all. – *Brandon Watson*

TOP 10 BEER THINGS TO LOOK FORWARD TO IN 2016 by Eric Puga

1) THE NEW LIVE OAK BREWHOUSE &

TAPROOM Since closing brewing operations at their Fifth Street location in the fall, Live Oak has left their fans at a cliffhanger. But when season 2 premieres sometime in the spring/summer (we're speculating), it will be a smash-hit success with a brand-new brewhouse, taproom, and drinkin' yard over in far East Austin. Live Oak also knows that introducing their first-ever canning line will be just the fresh concept to fire us all up, as top-rated HefeWeizen and their crisp Pilz will finally be available for garden parties.

2) ST. ELMO ON FIRE Founded by two former Austin Beerworks pros, this brewery and taproom will feature three perennials: Chico Pale Ale, Angus Stout, and the exceptionally lubricious Carl Kölsch, along with rotational seasonal offerings. St. Elmo plans to be open six days a week by the summer with an on-site food truck serving "Southeast Asian meets American drinking food" to keep happy-hour buzzes at bay.

3) HOPS & GRAIN KEEPS GRINDING Hops & Grain and Austin's chemistry is undeniable, and the next step in their relationship is to get a new house – well, a vacation home at least. While main operations will remain at the Calles Street brewery, H&G's second facility at FM 969 and Hwy. 130 will be partially devoted to warehousing the sour and wild barrels of their "Volumes of Funk" series. Naturally, this means a new tasting room serving barrel-aged and mixed-culture beers. This also means more large-format releases and a new canned year-rounder called 78702 that is – wait for it – a Kölsch.

4) PINTHOUSE PIZZA BEGINS TO DISTRIB-UTE No need to nurse that first-class hangover with only pizzas and salads. Now you can enjoy the city's best IPA program over wings, burgers, nachos, Wes Anderson films, or your very own porcelain potty, provided PHP agrees to your client request. Yep, Pinthouse's excellent, medal-winning brews will be even more accessible for Austinites, as they begin to sell beer, including the criminally spectacular Fully Adrift double IPA, to other bars and restaurants around the city.



5) THE BREWER'S TABLE After a lengthy brewing hiatus, Jake Maddux – historically of Thirsty Planet, New Belgium, and Anchor Brewing – debuts his much-anticipated brewpub devoted exclusively to wood-fermented beers with Ned Elliott of Foreign & Domestic running the all-wood-fired kitchen. Lagers are the top priority, with a few ales keeping the defense honest before morphing into multistrains in the foudres.

6) BLUE OWL & BLACK STAR COLLABOR-ATING Blue Owl is still calling up former bae Black Star on the party line and is all like, "hey." Which is marvelous news for beer fans. The power couple will brew its first collaboration beer together, a sour double IPA called "Can't Quit You." Expect that sometime around Valentine's Day as a taproom-only release.

7) FRIENDS & ALLIES Yet another brewery is sprouting on the Eastside and bringing a massive amount of brewing cachet with it. Head brewer Nathan Crane (Lost Abbey/Port Brewing, Elysian), Ben Sabin (Thirsty Planet), and Devon Ponds (South Austin Brewery, Lost Abbey/Port Brewing) will attempt to friendzone you with their debut session IPA called Noisy Cricket. Then Friends & Allies plans on a saison with Brettanomyces; a West-Coaststyle IPA, "Fresh Coast"; and perhaps a Berliner Weisse. A barrel-aging program and canned releases are also on the docket.

8) ODDWOOD ALES MOVIN' ON UP The coy, on-again, off-again nanobrewery originally housed at Adelbert's is getting its own deluxe apartment in the sky – or a building on Airport and Manor Rd. – that they plan to convert into a dedicated brewery and taproom serving Austin's most elite Saison. Oddwood's focus will be on wild ales and hoppy beers, with a small-batch emphasis on experimentation, including the highly anticipated release of their second-ever beer, Taming the Savage Heart, a tart blonde ale.

9) JESTER KING'S COOLSHIP On this season of Jester King Theatre, expect a trickling release of their 100% spontaneously fermented beer that has been inoculated with airborne Hill Country yeast and bacteria (the good kind, of course). The massively talented experimental brewery is "using native microflora on a particular night of the year to make a beer that's inextricably linked to a particular place and time, never to be reproduced again." 2016 will be the first time that Jester King will brew, blend, and bottle this untamable beer. Expect a crush of Instagrammers and Instagrandmas. We are also anticipating that elusive outdoor restroom finally being completed.

10) A BREWERY ROW IN AUSTIN? HOW ABOUT TWO? It's not 1992 anymore. Or even 2015 when Austin had *no* brewery row. Now, with the addition of several new taprooms in North Austin, including 4th Tap and Oskar Blues in addition to stalwarts Circle, Austin Beerworks, and Adelbert's, it appears that Austin will have itself a true brewery district. But wait! There's more! It appears that the Eastside will have its own crawl too, with newbies Friends & Allies, the Brewer's Table, and Oddwood Ales joining neighborhood powerhouses Hops & Grain, Live Oak, Blue Owl, and Zilker Brewing.

4) BLACK STAR CO-OP Tuck in for a game of Scrabble and a homebrew at this loungy pub that keeps it local with Gulf coast fish and chips and Texas-sourced meats for their sandwiches and burgers.

5) STILES SWITCH Leave Franklin and la Barbecue to the tourists. Real Austinites know that great local brew and 'cue can also be found in this North Austin restaurant – and without the line.

6) ALBORZ PERSIAN CUISINE Smile and say, "Ghormeh Sabzi." Alborz's kebabs and luscious stews continue to do their best to thaw American-Middle Eastern relations.

7) WINEBELLY Small plates with big flavors best define Winebelly's approach to food. Braised pork shank with rye spaetzle, anyone?



8) EL ALMA The rooftop view of Downtown feels so urban. But it's Alma Alcocer-Thomas' affordable, modern Mexican cooking that is this restaurant's siren song.

9) HENRI'S This elegant wine and cheese shop next to Barley Swine has blossomed into a serious restaurant serving crowd-pleasing bistro fare that doesn't break the bank.

10) PAPALOTE TACO HOUSE Whether it's cauliflower, pork in pumpkin-seed mole, or slow-stewed chipotle beef and plantains, Papalote's tacos are the genuine article.



TOP 10 SAVORY BITES

1) BISCUITS AT FIXE Soft, doughy pillows are encased in crisp, buttery exteriors. Great on their own, they are even better with whipped honey and butter.

2) CAULIFLOWER VELOUTÉ AT LEVITATION FRANCE Chefs from Angers, France, popped up a restaurant on the grounds of the French Legation during South by Southwest in March, and this silken soup was the highlight of my meal there.

3) PULLMAN BRIOCHE LOAF AT ST. PHILIP This heavenly bread was the base for several satisfying sandwiches here. My hopes that they would produce it for sale in the bakeshop were dashed when the restaurant closed. **4) CAULIFLOWER WITH RAISINS AND PINE NUTS AT ST. PHILIP** This was my favorite vegetable dish all year. Another reason I was sorry when the Uchi group closed this eatery.

5) FARRO SALAD WITH ONIONS, CUCUMBERS, AND TOMATOES IN BALSAMIC VINAIGRETTE AT 40 NORTH PIZZA Though I liked the pizzas here a lot.

one of the most memorable dishes was this hearty, well-balanced salad available as a side dish.

6) MAC AND GOUDA AT NOBLE SANDWICH CO. This luxurious made-from-scratch version of the American dinnertime staple had our group of diners fighting for the last spoonful.

7) SPAGHETTI AND MEATBALLS FROM ENOTECA VESPAIO A friend brought me a special delivery of this dish while I was recovering from surgery in a South Austin facility, and just knowing there was food this good so close by helped me heal quicker.

8) ENGLISH MUFFINS FROM I KNEAD THAT Hands down, these are my favorite things from Jasmine Jones' line of baked goods. Toast them with butter and slather them with jams or jellies from Confituras to discover just how I got hooked.

9) MUSHROOM PIZZA AT UNIT-D PIZZERIA The creamy white sauce, chopped portobellos, and cauliflower florets dusted with earthy porcini powder, plus truffles and a tangy shot of sherry vinegar, really set this pie apart from all the others I tried this year.

10) PASTA WITH MEAT SAUCE AT SETON MEDICAL CENTER Anyone who works at Seton Main or who has been a patient there can tell you this pasta dish with a simple, flavorful meat sauce is the one menu item everybody loves and looks forward to. It was the best hospital-made dish I had during my monthlong stay.

TOP 10 EATERIES BRINGING ASIA TO AUSTIN

1) XIAN SUSHI & NOODLE The centuries-old Chinese art of handpulled noodles is exhibited in fine form at this Mueller outlet, where a choose-your-own-noodle adventure (your pick of six sizes and shapes) makes for endless entrée options. Xian's shoyu ramen (I opt for the "spaghetti" noodle) gives Austin's celebrity ramen-yas (see No. 9) a run for their money.

2) LOVE BALLS Japanese street food served from a trailer on Spider House's patio satisfies my late-night cravings while transporting me back to the busy Tokyo sidewalks of my study abroad. Yatai offerings here include takoyaki (octo-pops) and yaki-onigiri (garlicky, grilled rice balls). Oishii! (That's Japanese for "Nom!")

3) WHIP IN Easily my favorite mini mart slash sour-beer brewery slash music venue serving Indian/Southern mash-ups, the Whip In is truly an Austin institution. You can't go wrong with dal hush puppies or the South Asian Frito pie, and I've never been disappointed with the specials.

4) SWAY This modern Thai spot continues to be my go-to for entertaining out-of-town guests or celebrating special occasions. With libations like tamarind drinking vinegar, house-made citrus-basil soda, and Sho Shiku Bai unfiltered cold saké, it's easy to enjoy a first course purely in liquid form. The prawn miange and blue crab fried rice and jasmine panna cotta take me to a special place, too.

5) UCHI Tyson Cole's South Lamar treasure trove offers a daily saké social (5-6:30pm) that makes this elegant Japanese joint accessible, in both atmosphere and price point. Machi Cure is a perfect pairing of smoked vellowtail, Asian pear, marcona almonds, and garlic brittle on a yucca "crisp" - without a doubt the best nacho you'll ever taste.

6) DIN HO North Austin's Chinese barbecue mainstay is great for large groups eating family-style around a lazy Susan. Order the whole roast duck: moist, fatty meat in a succulent glaze, pillowy steam buns stuffed with scallions and tangy hoisin sauce. An orphan Christmas at Din Ho left me and 10 transplants in barbecue bliss.



7) KIN & COMFORT This unassuming food court tenant inside Hana World Market merges Thai staples with down-home Southern comfort foods. Tom kha shrimp and grits, panang mac and cheese, and Thaitea pie will take you around the world then back before the next bite.

8) HANABI The best sashimi in Austin - generous slabs of sake, maguro, hamachi - comes from Hanabi's sushi counter. The house Hanabi Roll, crested with a trio of tobiko (red, black, and green roe), is as exquisite in flavor as it is in presentation. And you can wash down the works of art with a bomber of Kirin.

9) MICHI RAMEN Everyone's got a favorite in this town. Why does Michi make my list? Because corn and a pat of butter (Sapporo Ramen)! Because choices (light, regular, or stout broth)! Because addons (pickled mustard greens, fermented bamboo shoots, even smoked barbecue pork ribs)! It's ramen my way.

10) WU CHOW Downtown's newest Chinese restaurant gives us dim sum and then some. There's something extremely sexy about eating Chef Ling's soup dumplings: first puncturing the homemade morsels' meticulous folds and sucking out the stock. Then drizzling the doughy, chicken- and pork-filled remnants with Chef Chen's top-secret chile oil before popping it back into your mouth Need I say more?



TOP 10 SANDWICHES* by Melanie Haupt

1) SHRIMP BÁNH MÌ AT NG BMT Maybe that line at Ramen Tatsu-Ya is just a little too long, or your budget is a little too tight. Pop in to Hong Kong Supermarket, head to the back of the store, and order a legit bánh mì from the smiling lady in the Ng BMT stand. Lightly battered, peppery shrimp are napped with a house sauce and nestled into a fresh, house-made baguette alongside pickled vegetables. All this for only \$6.

2) THE LUCY AT AUSTIN DAILY PRESS Chunks of tender, moist, lemongrass-marinated pork mingles with a smartly curated assemblage of ingredients - sweet and hot pickles, Sriracha, and mint. Pairs perfectly with a side of pillowy jalapeño hush puppies.

3) CUBANA AT FRESA'S Naturally, the star of the show at Fresa's is the chicken, but the tortas aren't to be overlooked.

4) TCB AT SWIFT'S ATTIC It's brunch and you're feeling like giving your nutritionist (and your arteries) the middle finger. How about peanut butter slathered between two thick slices of brioche, topped with slabs of bacon and garnished with salted-caramel bananas? Elvis wishes he'd lived to enjoy this dish.

5) JAMBON BEURRE AT HOPFIELDS Sometimes simplicity is the best approach. Tender baguette gets a smear of butter, which is then overlaid with tender slices of shaved jambon de Paris. That's it, unless you want to add a couple of wedges of Camembert for a small upcharge (delicious but unnecessary). Served with a side of cornichons and lightly dressed spring greens, this is the perfect light lunch.

6) FRIED FISH SAMMIE AT LAUNDERETTE Sure, a fried fish sandwich doesn't exactly scream "ladies who lunch," but you don't feel weighed down by this lightly battered fillet served on a pillowy challah bun, accented by a delicate fennel slaw and Old Bay seasoning.

7) EL SAN ANTONIO AT EL SAPO I don't usually eat burgers, but when I do, I go for one that is also a stealth chalupa.

8) ROYAL WITH BRIE (HIS) AND CLEOPATRA (HERS) AT

GOURMANDS My husband loves the classic combination of roast beef and Brie (hold the sprouts), while I gravitate toward the assortment of briny/kicky/crispy veggies fit for a queen.

9) TURKEY AT STILES SWITCH Brisket may be king in this neck of the woods, but turkey is the sleeper protein at Stiles Switch. A standard Mrs Baird's bun is piled with juicy slices of Stiles' always-perfect smoked bird; I like mine without sauce but heaped with pickles. Enjoyed with a side of corn casserole and banana pudding for dessert, this sandwich is a winner, winner, chicken dinner,

10) VEGI SUPREME AT HALAL CORNER/KISMET CAFE

*Technically, a wrap is not a sandwich, but why split hairs when you could be devouring a pita filled with generous portions of creamy hummus, nutty roasted cauliflower, and hearty falafel?

TOP 10 COCKTAIL BARS by Melody Fury

1) THE TOWNSEND Justin Elliott excels again as the director of hospitality and bar program at this elevated bar and performance venue. The handsome hideout delivers reimagined vintage tipple that pairs seamlessly with charcuterie boards and thoughtful small plates.

2) ROOSEVELT ROOM Sectioned by eras, their extensive menu tickles a cocktail nerd like me. It spans from the early years (e.g., Martinez), to Prohibition (e.g., Last Word), and even highlights the "dark ages" (e.g., Cosmopolitan, no joke!). Bartenders' hands appear to float under spotlights as they shake and stir up an impressive range of beverages.

3) GARAGE This sexy yet cozy hideaway is the ideal post-dinner cocktail lounge. If you can look past the fact that it's tucked away inside a car park, expect no gimmicks here – just properly made classics with quality ingredients.

4) ISLA It's no shocker that the Péché could successfully execute a Caribbean-inspired cantina, sans tackiness. Here, this upbeat joint slings bold, rum-forward sippers like umbrella-garnished tikis and a beautifully balanced daiquiri on draft. Spam sliders to help soak up all the booze? Come to momma!

5) MIDNIGHT COWBOY Over the years, this brothel-turned-bar has evolved from a novel concept to becoming an institution among cocktail enthusiasts. The bartenders expertly craft signature drinks and classics by request, sometimes even tableside. It's a Dirty Sixth oasis without the raunch that still feels a bit naughty.

6) HALF STEP Chris Bostick mastered a cocktail concept that stands apart from the countless watering holes along Rainey Street. The combination of an indoor haunt and a shaded outdoor retreat welcomes cocktail-lovers that crave straightforward, seasonal drinks without the fuss.

7) DRINK.WELL This North Loop ol' faithful doles out creative concoctions with a side of hearty eats. Don't let the laid-back neighborhood vibe fool you. The bartenders often weave seldom-seen spirits and ingredients through the ever-changing cocktail menu.



8) BAR CONGRESS This stately hangout is consistently my no-fail pick. Jason Stevens performs liquor wizardry using intriguing house-made ingredients and obscure spirits. From shift-shots to zero-proof concoctions, guests are sure to find something that suits their mood, no matter the time of night.

9) GERALDINE'S Located inside the newly unveiled Hotel Van Zandt, this fourth-floor bar is a focal point in the luxe dining space. The plush lounge that overlooks the skyline comes to life during sunset. The Austincentric cocktail menu is quirky, cheeky, yet stylish. The Ladybird (Amontillado sherry, Argus Ciderkin, sarsaparilla bitters) and Willie's Cup (High West Double Rye whiskey, hemp seed milk, sage) are two standouts.

10) WHISLER'S Sandwiched among numerous dive bars, this easygoing bar appeals to Eastsiders that desire something beyond well drinks. I appreciate that it doesn't try to overcomplicate things. They simply whip up solid drinks to satiate neighborhood folks who bring their bikes and pups. Thai-Kun dishing out spicy nosh on-site doesn't hurt either.

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


Austin Film Critics Association Goes *Mad*

TOP 10 VIDEO GAMES by James Renovitch

1) HER STORY (Sam Barlow) Using an outdated computer interface, *Her Story* tells a crime tale using snippets of several police interviews. The only way to access those video files is to search the transcripts and watch them individually. The speed at which you unravel the twisted yarn depends on your acumen at separating the important facts from the red herrings. Are you the note-taking, deliberate type or more of a brute force player, searching random terms hoping to stumble upon a juicy detail? As the plot thickens, it becomes increasingly difficult not to exhaustively search out every moment of Viva



2) UNDERTALE (Toby Fox) The role-playing genre is rife with rules, and no game dismissed them like *Undertale* this year. It defies tropes with a young, female protagonist, a bullet-hell battle system, and an ability to finish the game without killing anything. From the moment an innocentlooking flower grows fangs and attacks, it's clear the interactions are going to defy usual game logic. So what kind of RPG is it? A great one. **3) ROCKET LEAGUE (Psyonix)** The year's biggest success story was also the best multiplayer game. The premise couldn't be simpler: soccer played with cars. It takes time to master (who would have guessed a car wasn't designed for sports?), but the genius of the game is that learning is as enjoyable as mastery. The pros can do flips in the air that make bicycle-kicked goals look tame, but seeing a rookie back into a ball by mistake and score the winning point is equally rewarding.

In a similar sign of the strength of performances this year, no single film swept the board in the all-important acting categories. Crunching the numbers shows that relative newcomer Alicia Vikander took the best supporting actress prize for sci-fi thriller *Ex Machina*, while Sylvester Stallone's return to ringside

for *Creed* scored him a judges' decision for best supporting actor. As for the lead awards, Michael Fassbender's eerie re-creation of the Apple founder for *Steve Jobs* was market leader for best actor. He's joined by *Room*'s Brie Larson for her depiction of a mother's determination.

As for *Room* itself, it took one of three special awards this year, as young star Jacob

4) DOWNWELL (Moppin) Like Spelunky before it, once you think you understand every procedurally generated possibility the game can create, it surprises you with a new combo of baddies and obstacles to make you throw your phone or computer across the room. But you'll also pray it's intact, so you can try again ... and again ... and again. You won't master it until you can almost read the mind of the game's designer.

5) SUPER MARIO MAKER (Nintendo) I'm sorry, is this heaven? Did Nintendo really hand over the tools from decades of Mario games to the hoi polloi? Yes, and it's as much fun and eye opening as you'd expect. Want to turn the tables on the plumbers by packing a level with thousands of the series' most squashable mushrooms? Done. It's also a telling look into game design (it's hard!) and the mind of Shigeru Miyamoto (it's weird!).



Tremblay won the Robert R. "Bobby" McCurdy Memorial Breakthrough Artist Award. Named in honor of late AFCA co-founder Bobby McCurdy, the award is intended to celebrate the arrival of a remarkable new talent. Arguably the same can be said with the selection of *Kumiko, the Treasure Hunter* to

receive the Austin Film Award. Recognizing works by directors resident in Austin during production, the prize goes to hometown talent David Zellner for arguably his most accomplished work to date.

Finally, rounding out the list of special honors, the AFCA singled out Austin animator Don Hertzfeldt for his short film "World of Tomorrow," already a Grand Jury Prize winner at the Sundance and SXSW Film festivals.

The awards were voted on over two rounds by AFCA members, which includes critics with Ain't It Cool

6) THE BEGINNER'S GUIDE (Everything

Unlimited Ltd.) Local developer Davey Wreden decided to double down on meta-commentary with his follow-up to *The Stanley Parable*. What starts out as a trip through a fellow developer's video games – curated by Wreden himself – quickly goes down one rabbit hole after another until it's impossible to know what's truth, what's fiction, who's real, and who's playing a character. I've never thought I knew where a game was going as many times as *The Beginner's Guide*, and I'm still questioning my conclusions.

7) STRAWBERRY CUBES (Loren Schmidt) Loren Schmidt said that *Strawberry Cubes* was an attempt to express the feelings he had as he lost his grandmother to dementia. The emphasis here should be on "feelings." The inscrutable but evocative gameplay offers players little to grab on to as each screen disintegrates before your eyes. The game doesn't say much, but the emotions expressed through design are palpable.

8) SPLATOON (Nintendo) It's amazing that it took this long for Nintendo to realize they can make a multiplayer shooter without abandoning their family-friendly image. Replace the bullets with paint and crank up the cute factor – not to mention the addition of surprisingly innovative tweaks to the genre – and let your kids shoot at their leisure.



Each "level" has nine controls that operate on X and Y axes. That makes for a delightful analog experience that reveals its joys quickly and its nuances gradually. Find that sweet spot of light, color, and sound, or keep searching for that perfect tone. It's in there.

10) FALLOUT 4 (Bethesda); METAL GEAR SOLID V: THE PHANTOM PAIN (Kojima Productions); THE WITCHER 3: WILD HUNT (CD Projekt RED); BLOODBORNE (FromSoftware) Yes,

I'm cheating here, but all of the year's blockbuster titles were too big to fail. Lumping these games together is not to say they are similar, although none of them will be remembered for their innovation. That said, if you couldn't find something fun to do in the massive worlds they created, you weren't trying.

POINT BREAK

D: Ericson Core; with Édgar Ramírez, Luke Bracey, Ray Winstone, Teresa Palmer, Delroy Lindo, Matias Varela, Clemens Schick, Tobias Santelmann, Max Thieriot, Nikolai Kinski. (PG-13, 113 min.)

Although using the same title, this remake of the 1991 cult classic directed by Kathryn Bigelow is essentially an extreme-sports showcase gussied up as a narrative film. Don't be deceived, though: To use a phrase made popular during a previous election cycle, gussying up this iteration of the film is like putting lipstick on a pig. Even the Jackass crew have demonstrated better storytelling capabilities when folding their stunts into feature films.

Using essentially the same broad plot outline as the original, the surfer crew who robbed banks while donned in disguising masks of ex U.S. presidents have morphed in this version into extreme athletes who surf, motocross, snowboard, rock-climb, and base-jump in flying wingsuits. Like the original ringleader Bodhi (who was played by Patrick Swayze as a surfing Siddhartha), the new Bodhi (Édgar Ramírez) also seeks enlightenment, but this Bodhi's path involves some mumbo-jumbo called the Ozaki 8 and eco-warrior ideals that promote the boosting of wealth and redistribution to the poor. Luke Bracey plays the newly minted FBI agent Johnny Utah who figures out the racket and infiltrates the group of extreme swindler/athletes. Bracey's colorless performance makes you long for the rough-hewn presence and idiosyncratic line delivery of Keanu Reeves, who played Utah in the original (a desire that caught me quite be surprise).

It's not that Bigelow's original is a dramatic masterpiece – the plot is really quite goofy, but in between the silly dialogue comes magnificent action footage – kinetic, dynamic surfing sequences, bank robberies, shoot-outs, et al. Director Ericson Core also served as the cinematographer on this remake, which is the field he started in before branching into directing. Core might be wise to hire someone else on his next film as his *Point Break* offers no

CHRON TO THE MAX 2015 SERVES UP A TASTY FILM CROP

No bemoaning the agonies of list-making this year; there are too many good films to celebrate. Fretting about the strictures imposed by lists seems self-indulgent. The lists here – and more online – offer guideposts to lots of excellent viewing.

Apart from Mad Max: Fury Road, the No. 1 film on our combined critics' Top 10 list, none of the films below are sequels, prequels, reboots, or do-overs. I fear for 2016, however, after Star Wars: Episode VII - The Force Awakens raked in a billion dollars in record time. This year's top 10 domestic box-office earners comprise 35% of all ticket sales, according to Variety. That's up 10% from last year. Perhaps reflecting the income inequality in U.S. society, the majority of boxoffice wealth is increasingly concentrated among the top few. What this likely means for the future is fewer original movies and more knockoffs of proven quantities.

So in the meantime, enjoy the still-fresh 2015 crop. The future promises lots of GMOs.

THE BIG SHORT

Director Adam McKay (Anchorman, Talladega Nights) makes moral outrage wickedly entertaining as he tackles the complex lead-up to the world-shaking financial meltdown of 2008, ably harnessing the considerable charisma of stars Carell, Gosling, and Pitt in order to explain collateralized debt obligation to the popcornmunching masses. Adapting from the nonfiction bestseller by Michael Lewis, McKay is all sleight of hand, using a zippy pace and regular punchlines to make more palatable the befuddling specifics of the banking crisis. But for all its plainspokenness, The Big Short is about misdirection. Its bearing is that of a heist movie, until it finally sinks in that our heroes' big gamble is to bet against the American people. The Big Short's conclusions are bleaker, more funereal than any I can recall from a popular entertainment - but at least it has the good humor to send us laughing all the way to the grave. Who would have thought that 20 years of consistently being hit on a football field would cause permanent neurological damage? That's the story of Concussion, which details how Omalu (Smith). a Nigerian immigrant with eight advanced degrees. discovered and diagnosed the progressive brain injury. and how the powers that be attempted to paint him as a quack. It's a whistleblower narrative to be sure, and it could have been a very effective one - Smith gives a solid, nuanced performance, and the story can be riveting at times - but director Peter Landesman often gets sidetracked. If Concussion had focused solely on Omalu's tireless efforts to expose CTE to the world, it would have been a powerful film. As it stands, it's just second-string. (12/25/2015)

Jordan, who plays Rocky's new protégé Adonis Johnson Creed - the illegitimate son of Apollo Creed (Carl Weathers) who died in the ring in Rocky IV before Adonis was born. For all its freshness, Creed still conforms to the familiar formula of a boxer's rise, beginnings of self-doubt, recovery of selfconviction, and ultimate triumph. But the performances are lovely, and Maryse Alberti's cinematography is deft and dynamic. Creed isn't a complete TKO, but it goes all 12 rounds with vitality and flourish. (11/27/2015)

This study in opposites would be a formulaic snooze were it not for the palpable chemistry shared by its two leads. Ferrell's flab practically bouncing off Wahlberg's six-pack in a comfortable give-and-take. Daddy's Home is one of those comedies that is not terribly good, but not nearly as terrible as it might have been. The plot is pretty basic, but it's this intrinsic lack of psychology or realism that allows the film to wend its way toward a happy ending. There's never a surfeit of fathers in this world. No time would seem better-suited for a film like The Danish Girl than now, but Hooper's film does little to enhance our understanding of sexual identity. Married couple Einar (Redmayne) and Gerda (Vikander) Wegener are both painters, living a bohemian lifestyle in 1920s Copenhagen until, it would seem, the touch of stockings stirs something new in Einar. Kurt Russell is John "The Hangman" Ruth, a bewhiskered bounty hunter escorting his captured quarry, the killer Daisy Domergue (Leigh), to the town of Red Rock. Along the way, their party grows: there's the corpse-bearing former Union soldier Major Marquis Warren (Jackson), ex-Confederate soldier Chris Mannix (Goggins), ornery Confederate officer Sanford Smithers (Dern), an English dandy executioner (Roth), cowboy Joe Gage (Madsen), and doleful Bob (Bichir). The less said about the specifics of the narrative, the better, although one can safely assume that there will be blood, and plenty of it. Housebound by a blizzard, things soon head south, albeit comically, as Krampus kicks out the jams with a decidedly unholy host of practical creature effects. The second half of the film introduces a whole new set of psychological dimensions which I won't get into here, since it should be experienced cold if possible. After losing two men in the film's tense opening raid - making it abundantly clear that the cartel's reach is far and wide - Kate Macer (Blunt), the head of the FBI kidnapping-rescue unit, becomes determined to avenge their deaths. Subsequently, she is offered a position with a shadowy team of agents, including surname-less Alejandro (Del Toro), a wilv marksman and cryptic mentor whose credentials remain mysterious, and enigmatic leader Matt Graver (Brolin). The performances are all first-rate, and Villeneuve ekes maximum tension out of every frame, but the film often seems disjointed, as if it cast the narrative net a bit too wide. That means Amy Poehler is assigned the good-girl role, her pet-rescuing little sis Maura the yin to Fey's salty yang, unemployed single mom Kate. When their parents (Brolin and Wiest) decide to sell the family home, Maura and Kate reconnect to stage a last stand and sabotage the home's imminent sale: They'll throw a rager, just like they did when they were high schoolers. Sisters unleashes pure comedic chaos once the party gets started, enriched by a core, existential dread: the fear that one's best times are already past. That doesn't make Sisters a downer. But most of all, he reins in this subgenre's tendency to paint its newspaper people as heroic crusaders with beautiful faces. The 33 opens with the notice that every year 12,000 miners die in accidents around the world, and closes with reminders that the San José mine owners were deemed not guilty of negligence and that the 33 have never been compensated for their trauma. The sober-minded Trumbo director Jay Roach's too-twee and terribly theatrical rendering of the battle that blacklisted Hollywood screenwriter Dalton Trumbo (Cranston) fought and finally won - dutifully clops through what came before and after the writer's famous appearance before the House Un-American Activities Committee in 1947 to discuss his perfectly legal involvement in the Communist Party. Trumbo declined to cooperate, along with other subpoenaed writers and directors: that first wave of unfriendly witnesses became immortalized as the Hollywood Ten, blacklisted from future work and forced to write under pseudonyms. Trumbo certainly has pep, but it's all nearly undone by the film's ironic decision to composite several Hollywood Ten writers into a single made-up guy (played by Louis C.K. - not his fault). Goodnight Irene

All times through paradise and even 2015

On Sept. 18, exactly three months before his 72nd birthday, Keith Richards released *Crosseyed Heart*. Two decadesplus had elapsed since his sophomore solo quake, *Main Offender*. As Netflix tie-in *Keith Richards: Under the Influence* informs to the guitar god himself, he's now outlived the bluesman whose song "Rollin' Stone" titled his UK combo – Muddy Waters.


Balladry from "Ruby Tuesday" to "Beast of Burden" remains Richards' compositional specialty, so *Crosseyed Heart* countrifies new backstabber "Robbed Blind" and calls in Norah Jones for a lovelorn reality check, "Illusion." Neither holds a candelabra to "Goodnight Irene." A traditional folk-blues, Louisiana-born, Texas-bred recidivist Huddie "Lead Belly" Ledbetter made it his own in 1933.

Where fellow Sixties big banger Bob Dylan inhabits Sinatra on *Shadows in the Night* from the far end of a May/ December timeline, Richards rockets back 40 years to one of the blackest chapters of his *Life*. Detained in Toronto for hoarding heroin, the poster Brit for rock & roll's bumper sticker slogan faced certain jail time. To cope, he holed up in a studio with sixth Stone Ian Stewart.

Everly Brothers ("All I Have to Do Is Dream"), Tammy Wynette ("Apartment No. 9"), Jerry Lee Lewis ("Whole Lotta Shakin' Goin' On") survive in Richards' trembling tenor on public domain bootlegs. A vulnerability first recorded on his solo vocal debut for 1969's apocalyptic *Let It Bleed* ("You Got the Silver"), the Rolling Stone hemorrhages naked fear and loathing via canonical lullabies. Bloodletting.

In fact, "Goodnight Irene" skirts a half-century of Marlboro abuse back past even his late-Seventies incarceration scare to some musical immaculateness. Teenhood revisited somehow. Keith Richards through all time in a single tune.

When Swedish death metal art merchants Tribulation spooked Mohawk the week after Fun Fun Fun Fest, best hair-raiser "Melancholia" summoned Seventies UK bullet train UFO as sure as Odin ordered Scandinavian church




burnings. That proved a synchronistic bookend to the OBN IIIs on the same stage days earlier during a FFF Nites opening slot for which they flexed new fusillade "Let the Music," perfect paean to Thin Lizzy's Phil Lynott.

Did Courtney Barnett reincarnate a sliver of Cobain? Will Kendrick Lamar be to hip-hop what Miles Davis was for jazz – fusionist? Can Grupo Fantasma become Tito Puente worldwide?

No great act creates any art other than its own, but root circles remain unbroken in the grimacing face of pop vacuity and global calamity.
