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
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Recommendations for the city and school district BY THE CHRONICLE EDITORIAL BOARD

The Chronicle editorial board offers the following endorsements for the Dec. 13 General Election run-off. In all three races, we repeat our picks from the first round. See lots more coverage at austinchronicle.com/elections.

Austin City Council

District 10: Alison Alter. Alter. a

philanthropic adviser, enters the run-off having taken 35.5% of the vote in last month's election, pitting her as the underdog to D10 incumbent Sheri Gallo, who nearly won outright with 48.2%. Gallo distinguished herself as the most pragmatic of Council's conservative trio and deserves credit for that. Alter offers the more progressive background and a number of endorsements from Democratic clubs. We agree with Gallo that her two years of experience would benefit a second term, but there is no doubt that Alter would be the more progressive voice on environmental issues. Her time on the Parks and Recreation Board (from which she was released, by Gallo, after announcing her bid for Council) and earlier work on the Ramsey Park renovation plan show that. Both candidates support the 20% homestead exemption that hamstrung Council's FY 2017 budget proceedings, something certain to please homeowners in District 10. We saw this

summer how challenging it was for Gallo and her colleagues to crunch numbers, and Alter didn't say anything to persuade us she would've fared much better. The fundamental difference between the two lies in approach to the city's explosive growth. Alter's bulldog efforts to hold developers accountable will best serve her district.

Austin Community College **Board of Trustees**

Place 4: Sean Hassan. Former Texas Education Agency auditor Michael J. Lewis has more ACC experience, but seems a little too lockstep with the current administration. Texas Education Partners co-founder Sean Hassan stands out for his passion, insight, and commitment to practical solutions to access and enrollment issues.

Place 9: Julie Ann Nitsch. Nitsch presents a strong option over Guadalupe Sosa thanks to her student's viewpoint and progressive credentials.

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This Too Shall Pass, Or ... Ain't Got Time for That Now

Long confident that the Constitution was smarter than us all, that its deep faith in the people would prevail, even when previous elections seemed disastrous, the feeling was "this too shall pass." But as never before, despair overrides any belief, as I host a real terror about Trump's presidency. Calmer voices chide us for such hysteria, cautioning that we need to wait to see what happens. Trump is our president; let's give him a chance. The country has survived worse. They advise that this concern is irrational, that a politician with bad ideas will be corralled by the three branches of government. Even a party loyalist is finally limited. After all, this is not an imperial presidency.

This reassures me not at all. It isn't that I oppose Trump's ideology, fearing his ideology will move the country in the wrong direction. Instead I'm afraid he has no ideology. There are no politics driving him. Lacking ideas, he does not possess a cohesive vision. He says exactly what he feels people want to hear. I often doubt he is even listening to himself. Instead of core beliefs there is only the rock-solid certainty of his own destiny, backed by his extraordinary egocentricity.

But Trump's supporters, disgusted with current government, politics, and the economy, are sick of rhetoric and meaningless campaign promises. They didn't vote for a platform; they voted for the man. What they want is a hero. The beacon of his outsize attitude shines through his nebulous politics, assuring all that he can achieve anything. He will bring jobs back, reverse the trade imbalance, restore manufacturing, and stare down the country's enemies. The U.S. under his leadership again will be all powerful and economically prosperous, morally and spiritually restored.

Rather than Teflon, his skin is absorbent; whatever is thrown at him strengthens him. Calling all his supporters racist or white nationalists isn't true, but rather than condemn even those it accurately describes, the charges just drain those words of meaning and power.



Consider that the right, not as a solid entity but in its many manifestations, has really grasped the concept that if you repeat something enough times, it comes to be accepted as a truth. "There probably has not been a more racially divisive, economic-divisive president in the White House since we had presidents who supported slavery," insisted Rep. Mo Brooks (R-Alabama). "Race relations in this country have not been this ugly and strained in decades. The president's divisive, racialist language and posture throughout his presidency has set the country back many, many painful years," added Breitbart columnist Charles Hurt.

They claim that Obama intentionally excited racial tensions, previously calmed, in oder to exploit them. Given conservatives are fond of accusing liberals of having their heads in the sand or ignoring history, these are astonishing statements. They illustrate a deep disconnect for many Americans between what is and what they insist is.

Along comes Trump. He blames the races. But says he is against racism. He assures the people we are under attack from within but he can fix it. Never elected to office, as an outsider he'll sweep the government clean. Not just certain there is a range of problems but that he alone can fix them. Radiating absolute assurance, the light guiding them through the fog is his attitude – reality is for chumps, political correctness for wimps, governing difficult only for the corrupt or insane. The least populist candidate in recent memory won as a populist.

The promises he made being all over the place and often impossible, what will happen when Trump realizes he can't deliver? The one skill he has proven again and again is turning Americans against each other, blaming others for "our" problems.

Instead of the new that is desired, his choices for his cabinet show how much he is not just business as usual but even less so. Picking the most outrageous and extreme, he already senses that the way to maintain the love of his supporters is to beat up on other Americans. Elected to do the impossible it is feared that he will do just what he can. Never have I more hoped I'm wrong. Consider this:

"Although this country is traditionally moderate-conservative, we are being told that the America-hating liberals who somehow stole their way to power are finally being beaten back. Mainstream media's already disturbing blandness was further diluted by the widespread acceptance that it is aggressively liberal and overtly partisan. ...


"Now ... some recent Chronicle letters, which note that the writers are longtime Democrats

HEADLINES

CITY COUNCIL MET Tuesday to officially canvass the results of the municipal election and set the **District 10 run-off** for Dec. 13. The next regular meeting is Dec. 1, when (among other things) they will confirm Asst. Chief **Brian Manley** as interim **Austin Police Department Chief**, in the wake of Chief **Art Acevedo**'s acceptance of the position of chief of the Houston Police Department. CHARLIE STRONG IS ... maybe not fired after all. Reports Sunday had it that the **University of Texas** had canned its beleaguered football coach after a dismal loss to Kansas – UT's first in Oz since 1938 – but the school then issued a wishy-washy statement saying it would evaluate Strong's future after Friday's season-closer against TCU. A press conference on Monday reiterated that the coach still has resounding support from his coaches and players.


AUSTIN PUBLIC LIBRARY Director **Brenda Branch** announced that she will retire in December after 40 years of service. Branch presided over the city's library system for the past 25 years.

SINCE THE ELECTION, hate incidents have risen dramatically. More than 700 have been reported as of Wed. Nov. 16, including nearly 50 in Texas, according to the Southern Poverty Law Center. The majority of incidents were directed at immigrants and the black community. Most took place at K-12 schools, with businesses and colleges not far behind. SPLC notes it made efforts to verify each report but that many remain anecdotal.

FORMER TEXAS GOV. Rick Perry met with President-elect Donald Trump on Monday in New York City. Under consideration for Defense or Energy Department secretary, Perry is on a Trump short list of cabinet hopefuls that also includes U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz. (Lord help us all.) While he criticized Trump during his own presidential run, Perry has recently cozied up to him since the prospect of a high-profile Washington job became a reality.

GROVE MATTERS: MEDIATION between the **Bull Creek Road Coalition** and developer **ARG Bull Creek Ltd.** continued over the weekend. A decision was expected to be announced sometime Sat., Nov. 19, but the parties actually worked until Tuesday afternoon trying to come to an agreement. The final deadline isn't until the specially called City Council meeting on Dec. 6.

NEW SXSW DIGS? The *Austin Business Journal* reports that South by Southwest is cooking up a new 12-story office tower at 1400 Lavaca. That property, *ABJ* reporter Jan Buchholz notes, is currently owned by CZ Properties LLC, a company registered to SXSW co-founder **Roland Swenson**. (*Chronicle* co-founders Nick Barbaro and Louis Black are also SXSW founding partners.) The Texas African American History Memorial, shortly after its unveiling on the Capitol grounds on Saturday, Nov. 19. A small group of white nationalists gathered in the background of the ceremony to protest the memorial, inciting a vocal back-and-forth with counter-protesters in support of equal rights.



What's Past and What's Present

CAPITOL EVENTS PROVIDE A SNAPSHOT OF CURRENT PREDICAMENTS

Saturday morning outside the Capitol, Austin was treated to a living diorama of Texas history and of things to come. A large crowd of officials and visitors cel-

ebrated the unveiling of the African American History Memorial, a project years in development and strongly supported by one of those in attendance, longtime state House member and now Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner, as well as his colleagues from the Legislative Black Caucus. The memorial, centered on Juneteenth and emancipation, reaches

back to the 1500s, through slavery, the Civil War, and into contemporary life, and takes its place among the gathering statuary (including Confederate memorials) that together represent an ongoing debate about the meaning of Texas history. Simultaneously, a small rally of "White Lives Matter" protesters gathered outside the Capitol grounds – part of a national event that unhappily coincided with the

nearby unveiling – and likely uncomprehending that the Capitol (like the UT-Austin Main Building) faces South for historical "Only White Lives Matter" reasons. The WLM contingent, some openly armed with long guns, were soon surrounded by hundreds of counter-protesters who made it abundantly clear that the racist demo was unwelcome. Among that

larger, nonviolent group was a handful of masked, self-styled revolutionaries, also armed, in a mirror image of those they came to denounce (and if possible, attack).

"Open carry" in Texas is bearing its inevitable fruit – as it did in the July massacre of police in Dallas - and Saturday it was left to state troopers, some on horseback, to separate the protests, no doubt hoping that the full-bore idiots on either side would stick to brandishing rather than using their weapons. One needn't be a police enthusiast to empathize with the cops, and to wonder if this is now our fully polarized American future: Gun-fetishists on one side facing off against gun-fetishists on the other, and in the middle, a line of cops representing what's left of the public interest. Capitol, monument, protest and counter-protest: an allegorical tableau, in the shadow of always complicated and contradictory U.S. history, never lacking for either heroism or brutality.

ACEVEDO'S FAREWELL

Police are on the Austin mind more than usual, not only because of dramatic scenes like these but because of the recent decision



by Austin Police Chief Art Acevedo to take the same job in Houston. Acevedo's move was probably inevitable, not only because he was repeatedly recruited by larger cities but because it's unusual for a big-city chief to remain in his position as long as the near-decade of Acevedo's tenure. While Acevedo's term has not been without controversy, in my more than 30 years of residence he's easily been the best person in the job. He's been much more proactive and outgoing than his predecessors, and he's done a lot to change the APD culture to a more communityengaged, progressive model. He's been outspoken on matters of gun control (not an easy police position in Texas), and he's honestly engaged public debate on racial discrimination and police violence. Has he resolved all those problems? Of course not - the belated revelation of the brutal Breaion King arrest, and the recently leaked recording of the chief berating his staff for their failures in these regards, confirm that APD still has a long way to go. But Acevedo has not ignored nor minimized those problems, and has been a major resource in seeking solutions.

Indeed, his effectiveness as a police advocate can be seen as a complicating factor in a much broader city problem: the burden of the APD budget on all other city services. Austinites routinely cite public safety in general and police in particular as their highest spending priorities, but they also increasingly object to the rising property taxes that underwrite public safety (now consuming more than 70% of the operating budget). And when charming, persuasive Acevedo annually presented to the City Council the pressing needs of APD - from staffing, to helicopters, to body cameras – it was and remains extremely difficult for council members to say no. That's inevitably made it more difficult for CMs who instead advocate more funding for basic social services, especially for young people - the kinds of programs that mean long-term reduction in crime, eventually reducing the need for more police.

Grieve Globally, Act Locally

A COUPLE OF LEGISLATIVE PREVIEWS

There's been so much post-election panic in the air focused on **Trump's America**, it's perhaps too conveniently easy to forget that we have our own state government circus coming to town in a scant six weeks. As usual, Texas' state legislators have even more being things in mind


more heinous things in mind for us than do their national counterparts; but on the other hand, there may be more openings for progressive policies to take hold at the state level, as urban influence grows, and as, for instance, problems with our **health care** and **school finance** systems become ever more urgent.

So, once you get past

Thanksgiving, and Black Friday, and Small Business Saturday, and Cyber Monday, and Giving Tuesday, perhaps block out four days next week for a pair of two-day conferences presenting different takes on a **legislative preview**.

The **2016 Dare Texas Summit**, presented by the **Center for Public Policy Priorities** next Wed-Thu., Nov. 30-Dec. 1 at the Hyatt Regency, 208 Barton Springs Rd., is "the place to connect with allies and share policy solutions ahead of the Texas Legislative session." HARD TO REPLACE

That contradiction is not going away under interim Chief Brian Manley or his successor, and I don't envy the next permanent city manager – subject of yet another nationwide personnel search - the job of finding Acevedo's permanent replacement. Occasionally a lightning rod for criticism, Acevedo has visibly done his best to sustain and improve the quality of Austin policing, and especially with an understanding of the increasingly diverse city Austin has become. We owe him sincere and generous thanks. And until we stop asking police to be the first responders to every social problem that our other public institutions have failed to address, we'll need to hire another APD chief who can bring Acevedo-like energy and insight to the job.

Council: Here Comes CodeNEXT ... Eventually

OFFICE POOL PROJECTIONS START AT SPRING OF 2018

It's that time of year when city business begins to work its way around the holidays, and **City Council** is no different. A special-called meeting Tuesday afternoon officially confirmed the results of the municipal part of the Nov. 8 election, and the scheduled Dec. 13 run-off for District 10, where incumbent Council Member **Sheri Gallo** (just shy of

a first-round victory at 48% among four candidates) will be challenged by **Alison Alter** (36%), in what looks like an unofficial referendum on the **Grove at Shoal Creek** planned unit development. The next regular Council meeting takes place Dec. 1, with an already posted agenda of 57 Items that doesn't yet feature any offerings from council members – expect that to change.

Meanwhile, last week Council hosted a special-called joint meeting with the **CodeNEXT Advisory Group**, for a staff update on where things stand concerning the CAG's **Land Use Code** revisions and a projection of the schedule over the next year – pointing to an adoption of a new code in the spring of 2018. If you were holding your breath in anticipation – exhale and take up another hobby.

The meeting itself was administrative and procedural, with a preview of the likely dates of various upcoming stages, and the minor revelation that the process should produce an actual map of the land code effects for the entire city (perhaps with some fancy online tools), as soon as this coming April. You can see a calendar of the entire schedule (CAG, boards and commissions, public meetings, and Council) on the Council Nov. 16 meeting page, and here are a few summary highlights:



• Through Jan. 2017: One or two additional joint sessions for Council and CAG

- Feb.-Aug.: Draft development, various levels of public outreach/response
- June: CAG report/handoff to Planning and Zoning & Platting Commissions
- Sept.-Oct.: Board and Commission public hearings, deliberations
- Dec. 2017-April 2018: Council public hearings, deliberations, adoption

This being Austin, and this being the highly contentious Land Use Code, the timeline is tentative and subject to revision at any time. Suffice it to say Council and the public will be debating this subject through at least the next year.

A few additional matters of note for December: The special-called meeting to discuss the Grove PUD is scheduled for Tuesday, Dec. 6 (the only action item, and coincident with or following that morning's work session), followed by a regular meeting Dec. 8 (to consider many postponed zoning cases) and another Dec. 15 (featuring the return of the almost equally contentious **Austin Oaks** PUD).

The posted agenda for the Dec. 1 meeting reflects a few more Items of interest:

• A supplemental construction contract for new **Central Library** (only \$5.5 million, but providing an occasion for more dais finger-waving).

• A revision of the city personnel policies on discrimination and harassment (the legislative outcome of the notorious "**Women**

Leading in Local Government" training session last March). • The oft-postponed appeal by neighbors of the **Scoot Inn** outdoor music venue permit (bearing another postponement request from those neighbors, likely to Dec. 15).

In another notable postponement: the invocation was to be delivered by **Jeremy Galloway** of Austin's **Satanic Temple** – something of a local breakthrough in non-sectarianism – but Galloway had to cancel for now, so any fire and brimstone from the dais or the public will have to wait. – *Michael King*

ACA Still Standing

The Affordable Care Act faces an uncertain future under Donald Trump, but Austin nonprofit Foundation Communities assures us Obamacare won't disappear in 2017. Contracts remain in place with insurance companies to guarantee at least one more year of the ACA's current structure. Its existence through 2018 remains uncertain. "People should be confident that they'll have insurance for the year," says FC program director Elizabeth Colvin. While some rates are increasing and certain plans have been canceled, there may still be a more affordable option. Once a plan is selected. Colvin insists prices will remain the same unless the client's income changes. "Don't assume it's too expensive or it's not going to work. We don't want people to think it's going to go away and miss out on this opportunity. They cannot dismantle the ACA overnight," she said. Central Texas residents are eligible for 30 plans through three companies (Ambetter, Blue Cross Blue Shield, and Sendero). Open enrollment runs now through Jan. 31. Those intending for their plan to take effect Jan. 1 must sign up by Dec. 15. - Sarah Marloff

Charitable Monitoring

Since many prognosticators believe serious journalism is on financial life support, maybe what we need is philanthropy for news outlets. That's not quite the program proposed by the online city politics newsletter the **Austin Monitor**, but its latest project puts another spin on the idea. The **Capital of Texas Media Foundation**, the nonprofit that publishes the Monitor, last week announced a new partnership with **GivingCity Austin**, a news and features site covering local philanthropy. While the two sites will still report independently, the hope is that the partnership will give each platform broader public impact. CoTMF CEO **Mike Kanin** said in a press release, "We believe that GivingCity is an excellent addition to our mission of engagement and education." GivingCity founder **Monica Maldonado Williams** added, "We think between the two organizations, more Central Texans will have the news and information they need to get more involved in the community." One philanthropic/journalistic suggestion: Persuade more readers that reporters need to eat, and Content Isn't Free ... – *Michael King*

Settlement for Cactus Rose

The Cactus Rose mobile home park community received a final relocation package offer from developer Oden Hughes, after a year of negotiations, meetings, counter-proposals, and public protests. CR's property owner, 500 Bastrop Highway Ltd., had originally applied to rezone the park community from singlefamily, commercial, and office to mixed use in Dec. 2015 to accommodate developer plans for luxury apartments and retail to be known as Lenox Oaks. More than 50 families lived in Cactus Rose when the application was submitted. Since, more than a dozen have moved out. The remaining residents will have nine months to vacate, although they have the option of moving sooner with advanced written notice. The financial relocation assistance provided to the family depends on living situation: Those in single-wide mobile homes will be offered \$10,000; double-wides receive \$20,000; and those in recreational vehicles or renters in permanent structures stand to receive \$2,000. Bilingual relocation assistance from a licensed real estate agent will also be made available to the residents. The final agreement stipulates that Cactus Rose residents will be relocated within 2.9 miles of their former neighborhood, though a general lack of affordable housing in that area makes that promise seem somewhat halfhearted. "This is by no means a desired

situation, but the mobile home residents are pleased with the agreement," District 3 Council Member **Pio Renteria** said in an email to the *Chronicle*. The council member had worked with the **Montopolis Neighborhood Contact Team**, community organization **Serve the People**, and CR residents to keep the neighborhood intact. "As a city, we are far from granting renters and mobile home residents the rights they deserve, but this is a step in the right direction." – *Joseph Caterine*


Seal the Deal

In 2005, Austin became the first U.S. city to ban the use of **coal tar sealants** on asphalt roads and parking lots, after a study by the city and the U.S. Geological Survey concluded that the toxic and potentially carcinogenic polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons contained in the sealants were leaching from the pavement and degrading local waterways, including Barton Creek and sediments in Barton Springs, Similar bans (now including San Antonio) now protect some 20 million U.S. residents - yet leaving the majority, especially children, still at risk. Now the American Medical Association has called for a nationwide ban on the sealants or PAH components - "Whether they are sending their children to a playground or repairing a driveway, Americans are potentially being exposed to harmful carcinogens in coal-tar-based sealcoats," said the AMA in a statement. Tom Ennis of Coal Tar Free America reported that both Lowe's and Home Depot have ended sales of the coal-tar based sealants, and that dozens of environmental organizations have called for stronger restrictions by the Environmental Protection Agency, and Austin Congressman Lloyd Doggett joined other representatives in pressing for additional protections. "We must listen to our scientists and public health experts," said Doggett. "It is long past time for a - M.K. nationwide coal tar sealant ban."



Anti-Trans Bill Author Bullies Media

State Sen. Konni Burton. R-Ft. Worth. filed legislation last week that would effectively force Texas schools to out LGBTQ students to their parents, a deliberate response to the adoption of transgenderinclusive policies at Ft. Worth ISD. SB 242 would entitle parents to a wider scope of their child's personal record including their "general physical, psychological, or emotional well-being," and "any general knowledge" even if those students want the information withheld. The potential law could pose serious and dangerous consequences for LGBTQ students who don't feel safe coming out to their parents, but want to confide in a school counselor, nurse, or teacher. Advocacy group Equality Texas cautioned the legislation would "essentially destroy protected communications between a student and an educator." Burton, unhappy CONTINUED ON P.20



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Sheri Gallo's Darned Emails

DISTRICT 10 COUNCIL MEMBER FACES SCRUTINY FOR CITY EMAIL USE

District 10 City Council Member **Sheri Gallo** is facing flak for the use of her city email address to contact district residents who live near the proposed location of the **Grove at Shoal Creek** PUD about the idea of selling their home. Critics say that in doing so, the CM, who faces challenger **Alison Alter** in a D10 run-off set for Dec. 13, has blurred the lines between her role as council member and her profession as a residential Realtor.

The accusation is based on a May 4 email sent by Gallo to a Rosedale couple (who asked the *Chronicle* they not be named) that was posted recently to the oppositional website **GalloforSale.com**, run by the Crestviewaffiliated **Arbor PAC** (see "Election Notes: Notes at the End of the Road," Nov. 4). According to the email, Gallo offered "to help facilitate a conversation about the potential sale" of their home – located on West 45th and Chiappero Trail, close to the proposed Grove PUD site.

Earlier this month, District 10 resident Alex Keller submitted a complaint about the email – which he learned about through neighborhood networking site Nextdoor – to the City Auditor's Integrity Unit, which investigates fraud, waste, and abuse allegations by city employees. CAIU told Keller that it doesn't investigate council members, and instead referred him to the Ethics **Review Commission**. A city auditor told the *Chronicle* that the agency "does not publicly discuss specific allegations or investigations."

While he did not go to the ERC, Keller filed a grievance against Gallo with the **Texas Real Estate Commission** on Thursday, Nov. 17. Keller told the *Chronicle* he filed both complaints because he felt Gallo's actions were unethical and presented a conflict of interest over a development she has been "pushing hard to pass" but the neighborhood opposes. "It's inappropriate for her to use her city email to conduct personal business," Keller said.

Gallo denies any wrongdoing. She told the *Chronicle* in a statement that she originally met with the homeowners and mayor's office in mid-April to hear their concerns about living next to the new road proposed under the Grove plan. The homeowners told her during that meeting that they were considering putting their property up for sale. In turn, she offered to reach out to the Grove's developers, **ARG Bull Creek Ltd.**, "and encourage ARG to discuss" the matter with the homeowners, Gallo said. "It was a single email purposely taken out of context."

"To be very clear, I never offered my services as a Realtor to [the homeowners] and never offered to be involved in any negotiations on the [homeowners'] property," Gallo continued. "The definition of 'facilitate' is to 'smooth the progress of,' 'make possible,' 'aid.' Helping the [homeowners] have the opportunity to have discussions with ARG was what I did." In a subsequent email, Gallo explained that the homeowners' father contacted her seeking help for his daughter and son-in-law.

The Chronicle filed a public information request for the email under scrutiny. That same day, Gallo's office delivered a copy of the email and the homeowners' May 4 response "in the interest of transparency," her spokesperson said. A review of the email chain indicated that ARG's attorney, Jeff Howard, had contacted the homeowners in late April regarding the potential 5 sale, but that Gallo didn't know nor was involved in that conversation. The homeowners' response also does not indicate that Gallo offered her professional services. The homeowners told the *Chronicle* that they had no interest in selling their home. The couple said Gallo presented a printed TCAD document indicating the appraisal price of the home when parties met, but seemed to "act more as a



facilitator between us and the developer in selling our house."

"As a Realtor I would have to be hired by either the seller or the buyer of a property to provide my services," confirmed Gallo. "If you ask that question of the ... family and ARG you will find the answer is 'no,' I was not hired by either party."

It is general knowledge that contributors to the Arbor PAC have also donated to Alter's campaign, and Gallo does not stop short of connecting Keller's accusations to that PAC. Alter told the *Chronicle* in an email that, beyond accepting those contributions, neither she nor her campaign has worked with the Arbor PAC. "However, it is clear that Sheri Gallo has angered a lot of neighbors and community groups because of her pro-developer efforts on Council," she said. *– Annamarya Scaccia*

Leave the Driving to Us

The New York Times reported Monday on the genesis and distribution of a "Fake News" story triggered by a tweet by Austin businessman **Eric Tucker**, who saw some parked buses on an Austin street two Saturdays ago, noted that there were anti-Trump protests happening Downtown, put two and two together and came up with 13 ("How Fake News Goes Viral: A Case Study," by Sapna Maheshwari). Tucker decided that the only possible reason the buses were in town was to bring out-of-town protesters into Austin, and he posted: "Anti-Trump protestors in Austin today are not as organic as they seem. Here are the busses they came in. #fakeprotests #trump2016 #austin." Although Tucker himself didn't have many followers, in short order his tweet was picked up by various hard-right websites and then went viral on Facebook, and hundreds of thousands of viewers were told that "outside agitators" were being bussed into Austin, likely paid by none other than **George Soros**. Reporters soon found the bus company (**Coach USA North America**) and the actual conference (13,000 people for Tableau Software). None of that mattered despite correct reports from the Austin American-Statesman and others, the corrections (and Tucker's eventual, defensive retraction) went almost entirely unnoticed. Amidst all this dim-witted credulity, it never occurred to Tucker, the various right-wing sites (which likely still believe and circulate the nonsense) - nor even to The New York Times - to ask where all these protesters were supposedly recruited; Waco? College Station? Amarillo? Cut and Shoot? Are none of these folks even dimly aware that Austin does not need to bus in protesters from *anywhere*, to protest anything? Please, people, a little respect! And if anybody's paying ... please tell us where they're handing out the checks. - M.K.

MAYOR FORMS RACISM TASK FORCE

When Mayor **Steve Adler** came to work last week after announcing the formation of a task force to address the city's institutionalized racism, some colleagues took it personally: "Who are you going after? You're not aiming at me, are you?" he said they asked. To pacify those failing to acknowledge the painful reality of implicit racism or who simply remain unaware of it, Adler stressed that his new initiative isn't targeted at individuals, but rather at systems.

"It does not mean that we're racists here in Austin or that we have a racist society," said the mayor. "What it does mean is that we have structures in place that create unjust and inequitable outcomes."

Speaking to the press last Wednesday while flanked by members of the newly created task force, Adler called on the city to "own the challenge" of fixing systemic inequities – with a first step set as understanding that it exists. Motivated in part by the February fatal shooting of **David Joseph**, and APD Officer **Bryan Richter**'s brutal June 2015 arrest of teacher **Breaion King**, the mayor's task force will take a comprehensive look at institutional racism locally, with plans to come back by March with an "action plan" to combat the barriers. "Don't be afraid to break some eggs," Adler advised. "I'm not interested in just turning up the dial on the status quo. I want things to be shaken up."

Colette Pierce Burnette, president and CEO of **Huston-Tillotson University**, and **AISD** Superintendent **Paul Cruz** will co-chair a steering committee of nearly 50 community leaders. Recent instances of police abuse served as impetus, but the task force's goal is broader than criminal justice reform. Five subgroups will tackle:

- criminal and civil justice;
- finance, banking, and industry;
- real estate and housing;
- education; andhealth.
- e nealui.

Adler says the task force was not timed to coincide with the presidential election, but he believes campaign rhetoric has served to "sensitize people to some of the issues" he hopes the group will analyze.

After releasing their report next spring, the group will disband. Asked why a group tasked with fixing a deep-rooted, ongoing problem would dissolve within six months, Adler said its actionable items, taken to the community, Council, and boards and commissions, will pervade. However, Adler and the task force co-chairs intentionally kept those action items vague. "It's a clean slate and that's how we get to something that really causes change," said Pierce Burnette.

Task force member Chas Moore, of the Austin Justice Coalition, a grassroots organization working locally to reform criminal justice, says he's surprised to hear the mayor publicly acknowledge the city's institutional racism. From black residents being pushed out of the city ("The Case of Austin's Declining African-American Population," Nov. 3, 2014) to persistent gentrification, and the 2013 officer-involved shooting death of Larry Jackson Jr., Moore and others in minority communities see the issue as longrunning and pervasive. "Austin is great in theory - the food, the music - but when it comes to people's access to resources I think that's where we kind of dropped the ball," said Moore. "We need to realize people of color are being displaced and we need to understand the city isn't necessarily booming for them."

Moore classified the task force as a progressive step in the right direction. "Police brutality has made us look at everything in society differently," he said. "I want us to create safe spaces for black and brown people. And I want people to feel comfortable wherever they go in Austin." – Mary Tuma

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Out of Focus What's the future of body cameras in AUSTIN? THAT'S UP TO THE COURTS FOR NOW.

A trial that may break the city's stalemate over the initial purchase of 500 new **body cameras** for **Austin Police Department** officers remains slated to begin Nov. 28. Sources familiar with the case say it will almost certainly be postponed because of appeals currently pending in the **3rd U.S. Court of Appeals**, with the holdup potentially lasting until early 2017. Equipping the first group of officers with devices will be delayed even longer. A spokesperson at APD reports the department has to date provided only 26 cameras to its patrol officers, though an indeterminate number of cops have bought cameras on their own.

The trial would give Georgia-based Utility Associates Inc. the opportunity to present its case in a district court as to why it – and not Taser International – should have won the bid to provide APD with body cameras. Both sides had until Nov. 21 to file briefs. The appeals panel has until Nov. 30 to choose next steps – an obvious impediment to a target trial date of Nov. 28 – such as whether to hear oral arguments, as Utility and co-plaintiff Bruce Evans have requested. (Evans is a local resident who joined Utility's suit in July.)

Nearly a year after city officials issued a request for proposals for body-worn devices, the purchasing effort remains in legal limbo, largely due to the unrelenting efforts of Utility president **Ted Davis** to wrest the contract away from Taser. Davis has made clear he feels his company has been cheated by the city's procurement process. While critics see Utility as a poor loser trying to force a win at the city's expense, Davis says he's fighting on principle. "What we want is the contract to be awarded to us," he told the *Chronicle.* "We earned it. We provided

A trial that may break the city's stalemate the best response at the lowest cost that met all the requirements."

The legal battle began after the city denied protests Utility filed this summer. Council voted to approve the contract award to Taser June 23, amid testimony from Davis and others who expressed concerns about the choice, as well as concerns about the city's simultaneous purchase of iPhones to accompany the cameras - which appeared to some as a backdoor add-on to Taser's contract. APD Commander Elv Reves told Council in June that the Taser contract included iPods, and that APD discovered during the postselection testing of Taser's camera that iPhones were preferable. He maintained they were not an essential part of the body camera procurement. "If the cell phones are not approved, the Taser body camera is still the better product. And we would just include everything that's in the proposal as submitted by Taser," Reyes said. The issue raised concerns, in part because the iPhones, if considered part of the total package, added \$5 million to Taser's bid, which was roughly \$3 million higher than Utility's.

The city signed a contract with Taser on July 12, just four days after Utility petitioned the district court to stop the city from moving forward. That move, if an attempt to circumvent Utility, may have backfired: On Aug. 5, Judge **Orlinda Naranjo** ordered that the city be prohibited "from performing any of their obligations arising under or in furtherance of the contract," and from closing the RFP process "pending a trial on the merits of plaintiffs' claims." Since, the city has been left holding a signed contract with Taser that it can't act on, and a procurement process it can't officially close.



The city has denied that Utility's claims are valid without addressing the substance of most of the company's complaints. It has focused instead on getting Utility dismissed as a plaintiff without proper standing and worked to reverse the court's decision to bar the city from moving forward with its intended purchase. Utility sought to build a case on a paper trail of potential purchasing irregularities and its own claims of technical superiority paired with lower costs. Davis said his initial challenge was fueled by his personal knowledge of what the Taser product could do compared with the RFP's requirements. Later, he obtained documents he says provide proof of violations of the city's procurement rules. If or when the case goes to court, a judge will decide whether Davis' accusations hold water.

The city announced March 8 that Taser was the apparent successful bidder – the company's bid to provide body cameras had been evaluated as the best choice on paper and met the basic requirements. However, emails between city procurement staff and Taser executive **Andrew Grayson** from late March show that some confusion lingered about what was included in the bid, and exactly what the functionality of the package offered by Taser would be. Email exchanges from May also make clear that city staff did not know whether iPods were included as part of the original bid, even though staff indicated that based on the pilot testing completed in mid-April, iPods or other devices with "smartviewing" capacity would be needed to make cameras perform as desired. In at least one communication, dated May 31, a staff member from Purchasing clarified that no such devices were included in the original bid, in answer to a question posed by the city's Financial Services Department.

"All we are asking for is fairness and that things be scored appropriately for all respondents," Davis

said. "If we don't win because of systems that are rigged, then I am doing [my employees] an injustice by not fighting it." But he also said he believes that what he's arguing for is best for Austin. If given the chance, "we would provide the city and the taxpayers with the best body-worn camera system on the planet," he said.

Explanations from the city have not been forthcoming. City Media Relations Manager **David Green** wrote that due to the ongoing litigation, "staff is not in a position to provide a detailed discussion of technical, complex, and nuanced issues" raised by the *Chronicle*'s questions. And he reiterated the city's belief "that this procurement process was robust and handled in accordance with all applicable purchasing regulations." City Council Members **Don Zimmerman**, **Greg Casar**, **Leslie Pool**, and **Ora Houston**, who serve on Council's Public Safety Committee, had failed to comment by deadline.

With no end in sight, Austinites may be left hoping for a swift out-of-court resolution, even if it means less transparency with regard to the procurement process and its results. In the meantime, Austin police and the community they serve will have to depend on existing technology (dash cams, spectator cell phones, and the occasional officer-owned body camera) – along with the human eye – to bear witness the next time a controversial encounter flares. – *Margaret Nicklas*



ACEVEDO OUT, MANLEY IN, SEARCH FOR PERMANENT CHIEF IS ON

By Tuesday, Nov. 29, Police Chief **Art Acevedo** will be out at APD. He's expected in Houston's City Hall to swear in as the Bayou City's top cop the next day. Austin's City Council will swear in current APD Chief of Staff **Brian Manley** as interim chief Dec. 1, thereby completing a three-day transfer of power that's expected to hold for the next 12 to 18 months.

The changes will bring an end to Acevedo's nine-and-a-half year tenure at APD's helm - a long time for such a position in major cities, something he noted somewhat regularly during his last 10 months in service. Knowledgeable sources within APD didn't know Acevedo was actually leaving until last Wednesday, the day before news broke to the public, but in many ways his departure was a long time coming. The chief has faced an endless barrage of muscle from his union, the Austin Police Association, since February, when the APA opposed his management of the David Joseph shooting. Grievances followed. In April, departed City Manager Marc Ott docked Acevedo five days' pay for insubordination and "undermin[ing] the state approved Police Academy training," another fallout from the Joseph shooting. The union was further angered this summer and early fall after news of Bryan Richter's violent arrest of Breaion King went public and the chief went down to the state Legislature to lobby for a longer statute of limitations on the amount of time a department can take to discipline officers.

No single thing pushed Acevedo out, however. In fact, many city staffers who keep close watch on the chief agree that Acevedo could have stuck around Austin forever had he liked. Chief Acevedo was tremendously popular within the community, and within parts of City Hall. As Mayor **Steve Adler** wrote in a statement shortly after Acevedo's

imminent departure was announced: "[R]eplacing him will be a daunting task."

Manley takes over for now. He was the obvious internal choice as the department's chief of staff - an Austin cop since 1990, the second in command who interacted often with Council and city commissioners. A process to find a more permanent replacement should get underway whenever the city hires a city manager to permanently replace Ott. (Elaine Hart, previously the city's chief financial officer, has been running the city on an interim basis since September.) That could take a full year, however, meaning that Manley could hold the position for a while. Expectations are that the search will include candidates both internal and external. Who's Speaking Your Language?

APD LACKS MULTI-LINGUAL OFFICERS AS POPULATIONS CONTINUE TO GROW

As **Choon Kim** was driving away from his North Austin church several years ago, another car rammed into his. Like any good Samaritan, the Korean man called the police. When an officer arrived, Kim was stunned: The cop gave his attention to the English-speaking woman driving the other car, all but ignoring Kim's perspective.

"Why [do] you not hear me? I called you!" Kim, now 71, remembers asking the officer.

He's not the only foreign-speaking resident of the city who thinks the police are not appropriately listening. As Austin's population continues to increase, the city is seeing more and more languages other than English being spoken. That poses a big problem for a police department charged with keeping pace with the evolution. At present, the Austin Police Department only has 11 officers proficient in Asian languages, according to information gathered as recently as September. Yet the Asian population represents around 6.5% of Austin's residents, with representation mostly from India, Vietnam, and China. Projections show that, by the middle of the next decade. the number of Asians in Austin will more than likely exceed the number of African-Americans. While the general population of Austin doubles every 20 to 25 years, the number of Asians in Austin continues to double each decade.

To this point, APD has never set a specific quota for developing new bilingual officers, says Marci Graham, a sergeant with the department's recruiting division. "We'll take as many as we can," said Graham, who told the Chronicle that she had recently returned from a recruiting trip to Puerto Rico. "But as far as putting a number, we don't do that." The department has set up an annual stipend bonus for officers bilingual in "approved languages." Any officer recognized as bilingual receives an additional \$2,100 each year. At present, APD claims four officers who speak Mandarin, four who speak Vietnamese, two who speak Korean, and one who speaks Thai, according to the Public Information Office. Among the other approved languages, there are 284 Spanish-speaking officers, seven German speakers, four who mastered American Sign Language, two proficient in Russian, and two in French.

APD has to this point not hired police officers who speak Cantonese, Japanese, or Malay. Nor has the department been successful recruiting cops who speak Arabic or Ukrainian. Hindi and Urdu are not approved languages that qualify for the stipend, even though they are more commonly used in Austin than German or Russian, according to Data USA. A department spokesman declined to say why the two languages are not on APD's approved list.

Yuanshu Cai of the Asian American Cultural Center in Austin suggests: "If the city wants to grow, [APD] should get more



bilingual officers." Lisa Cortinas, with the Public Information Office, says APD 'doesn't have an annual budget allotment for bilingual pay," but that there is also no limit on the number of sworn employees who can get the foreign language stipend. The department adds that it's trying to place its bilingual officers on patrol beats where they're most needed. "APD tries to use an equitable system throughout the city regarding the placement of Spanishspeaking officers during their initial assignment," Officer Luis Cadena, an instructor at APD's Training Academy, told the Chronicle via email. "Speaking another language fluently may be a small contributing factor in where the officer may end up working."

Despite not having a framework to place bilingual officers where their language skills are needed, there are times when officers are able to help people whose first language is not English. A Taiwanese-American officer, who asked she not be identified by name, told me that she had to communicate in Mandarin with a father after he had left his baby in his car long enough for the child to die. The man was nervous and couldn't communicate in English. "Sometimes when you get ... distraught you go to your native tongue," said the officer, an eight-year veteran with APD.

Sgt. Graham told the *Chronicle*: "We want the police department to represent the community. As the police, we want to not only communicate, but be able to help people in need, especially if it is an emergency." The department does have a cultural immersion program that involves taking new cadets to various cultural centers in Austin to interact with ethnic groups and learn about traditions, biases, and customs. "If you don't know this, it makes your job harder," says the aforementioned officer. She added that she has received calls at home from officers who need her to serve as an interpreter for certain incidents.

When there is no bilingual cop available, APD officers can call the Language Line, a 1-800 number for **Voiance Language Services**, which has a contract with the city of Austin for \$281,028, to provide real-time interpretation services. "It is not as good as having an officer on the scene with you, who can interpret, but it is at least another option," says Sgt. Graham. – *Omar Rodriguez Ortiz*

Police Union Subpoenas Mayor

The Combined Law Enforcement Associations of Texas, the umbrella body of police unions across the state, issued a subpoena to Mayor Steve Adler Monday that calls for the mayor to testify in the upcoming arbitration hearing for Geoffrey Freeman, the Austin police officer fired in March for the fatal shooting of David Joseph, According to CLEAT Executive Director Charley Wilkison, Freeman's counsel wants to grill the mayor for his public citing of "their individual cases" - Freeman's and Bryan Richter's - during last week's press conference announcing a new task force to combat institutional racism. (Richter, under investigation for the June 2015 arrest of **Breaion King**, hasn't gotten docked with any discipline yet, but likely will: it appears CLEAT's getting out front of that.) "The Travis County grand jury cleared both of them of criminal wrongdoing, but the mayor cannot wait for the process to finish," Wilkison told the Chronicle. "He has inserted himself into undoing their due process rights. He's clearly seeking to influence the outcome of the arbitration."

Mayor Adler denied any such interference Monday evening, reminding the paper that he's "not involved in such personnel decisions" and has not publicly "taken any position on anyone's legal or civil culpability." He added that the inspiration for the task force wasn't Freeman and Richter's police actions but rather "a larger conversation that our entire country is having," one he began in his official capacity last summer. "There is a difference between discussing institutional racism and whether any one person is racist," said Adler. "We'll be a better Austin when we understand that difference."

Freeman's arbitration is scheduled to begin Dec. 5. – Chase Hoffberger

Why We Should Reach Across Borders, Not Close Them

A nation's border is nothing in and of itself. It's just an inanimate line that has no philosophy, personality, feelings, or meaning, beyond what people on either side attribute to it.

Unfortunately, thanks to **Donnie Trump**'s xenophobic demagoguery in this presidential election, America finds itself in a destructive border war – not with Mexico, but with itself. In his rallies, Trump led his true believers in angry chants of "Build that wall!" – demanding that our southwestern border with Mexico be turned into a hostile barrier of national, cultural, and racial separation that will physically scream at Latino people, "Keep out!"

You can see it for yourself, for about a third of that 2,000-mile frontier already has a massive metal wall, thrusting up to 30 feet high. It scowls at Mexico with pole-mounted cameras, 24-hour radar, vibration sensors, all-seeing drones, surveillance balloons, and Black Hawk helicopters.

It has made the border mean, yet – get this – it doesn't work! Migrants and traffickers continually overcome it. "The wall is a fantasy," says an Arizona border sheriff. Also a rancher who's a die-hard Trump supporter dismisses Donnie's barrier scheme as a "farce."

Worse, the existing wall and Trump's extension of it is a perversion of what this border has been for centuries: an enriching connection point for people on either side. In fact, there were no sides – festivals paraded from Mexico into the U.S. and back again, businesses were totally bi-national, families extended across the so-called line, and the community was an organic whole.

Trump's wall won't keep undocumented migrants out, but it will lock out America's egalitarian ideal of cross-culturalism. Rather than walling-off borders, our true national security requires that we reach across them.

Thanksgiving as a refugee in America

The Al-Hallaq family just celebrated its first-ever American Halloween. In their small East Austin apartment sits a smiling pumpkin on a shelf, situated above rows and rows of children's shoes. Their kids – three girls, their saffron-red hair tied into lattices, and a son – are in the room. The youngest play with blocks. The older children sit quietly, fidgeting occasionally as their parents talk. The smell of Turkish coffee fills the room. Through a translator, Othman Al-Hallaq apologizes: He used to have some of the best coffee from Jordan, but recently ran out. His wife Hanan says she thinks today's cup tastes just as good.

A month ago, the Al-Hallaqs arrived in America as refugees, having fled from the violence of their native Syria and literally walked across Middle Eastern borders toward an uncertain future. Othman is honest about their journey: "We left because I didn't want anything to happen to my kids."

Before the war, the Al-Hallaqs lived in Homs, a Syrian city about 30 miles from the

Lebanese border. Othman was a blacksmith and builder. Together, he and Hanan had a house and some land out in the country. That they would ever have to worry about hunger or bombings was unimaginable. "We never even thought we would leave our city, never mind our country," said Othman.

The anti-government demonstrations started in 2011. Now, said Othman, "the whole city is demolished." But the situation was already collapsing when the Al-Hallaqs left in 2011. Food was scarce; medical care almost nonexistent. Othman mentions their kids again: He wouldn't let them get sick in a land without readily available treatment.

For a while, Hanan spent time at their country plot while Othman looked after the house. When a rocket landed near their home, it was their final straw. They traveled to a relative's in Damascus, then to the city of Daraa, before walking two hours across the countryside, dodging army patrols, to cross their way into Jordan. The Al-Hallaqs stayed for four years, with no real support or infrastructure. The kids would get sick – which Othman and Hanan feared the most. Othman found a job making doors: a fourhour commute almost to the Saudi Arabian border and back. Then they learned that they were eligible to be resettled in America.

The Al-Hallaqs didn't choose the United States. They were simply told that the country was where they would end up going, just as Othman's brothers and mother were told they were going to Sweden. They expected California, or maybe New York, but in the end got assigned to Austin.

The Al-Hallaqs are not the only Syrians in this city, or even in their apartment complex. Downstairs, Mohammed Aladawi opens his door and greets me with a shake of his left hand. His right stays in his pocket – a glassy scar on the wrist the outward sign of partial paralysis. Back in Syria, in Daraa, Aladawi owned a little candy store, selling chips and sweets. But he was really a farmer with his own land. His family would grow everything, he said: "wheat, watermelon, beans, lentils." When the war came, and they were besieged for three months, the Aladawis could at least feed themselves.

But then the Aladawis were faced with a conundrum. The siege was temporarily lifted, but with conditions: Families could leave, but fighting-age men had to stay. The land was precious, but nothing was as precious to the Aladawis as their kids. When the family saw bombings again, they chose to take their children to safety. Like the Al-Hallaqs, Mohammed Aladawi, his wife, and their five children traveled to Jordan – no luggage, no trace of their old lives – first by car, then on foot for nearly nine hours toward the border.

The Aladawis made it to Zarga, a city of 350,000 in northwest Jordan; a city born of migrants founded last century by Chechen refugees fleeing the conflict between the Ottoman and Russian empires. They found a home. Charities and nongovernmental organizations helped them accumulate clothing. They even managed to get the kids into school. Migrating a second time wasn't on their minds, until the family got a call telling them that the U.S. would consider taking them. They started the application process. Two-and-a-half years later, they left Zarqa for Austin, arriving on Sept. 1 - the same day that the Al-Hallaqs also entered the country.

A WELCOME ARRIVAL

The big shock was the temperature. While Syria borders the Arabian Peninsula, the Southwest Asian nation is temperate: Eighties in the summer, snowy in the winter. Jordan was hot – too hot sometimes. The Aladawis hoped the U.S. would be cooler, but Austin proved hotter than Jordan. Its November weather, Mohammed Aladawi said, is like high summer in Daraa. But it's easier now to be outside, like he would have been in his fields back home.

Anyway, it's not the weather that troubles the Aladawis. It's the future. What no one told them before they arrived in the U.S. was that any assistance they receive will dry up in four months. Had they known, the Aladawis may have stayed in Jordan, where life was tough but at least predictable. Now they don't know what they will do after the new year, or how they will afford to stay in their apartment. There are programs available, but many require a work component. Mohammed is looking for work – farmers don't really know how not to perform labor – but that deadline is ticking.

The Aladawis have asked whether they could go elsewhere. Like the Al-Hallaqs, they have relatives in Sweden, as well as in Austria. But leaving is now too difficult, so they have instead told friends and family back in Jordan to try to go to Britain or Canada, where the institutional help for the helpless is deeper than in America.

But there is help. Both families learned this on their first day arriving in Austin. Exhausted, with four kids in tow, the Al-Hallaqs got lost inside of Austin-Bergstrom International Airport. After two hours wandering around, a staff member helped them find their luggage and connected



them with volunteers there to meet and taxi them to their new home. It was a shock, but the right kind of shock: The apartment was furnished, a hot meal was on the table, and toys had been laid out for the kids. Othman said: "We'll never forget the generosity."

The volunteers were with Refugee Services of Texas, whose organizational spokesman Chris Kelley stresses the importance of the airport pickup. "There's a real corre-

lation between the welcome a family receives and how that critical first 180 days proceed," he said.

RST is one of the local nonprofits officially designated to help resettle refugees in Texas. Refugee is a legal status, defined by the Immigration and Nationality Act and enforced by the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. The term refers to someone outside the U.S., either a foreign national or a stateless

person, who finds themselves forced to leave their country of residence due to persecution or fear of persecution because of their race, religion, nationality, political opinions, or membership of a particular social group. Being a refugee means you're caught between multiple countries, international aid agencies, local agencies, resettlement organizations, and volunteers. In Austin, RST is a lead partner. While other cities have their advantages - Dallas and Houston have bigger and more established Arabic communities, while the well-paid food processing jobs in Amarillo can be a big draw for workers - Kelley said that Austin sets itself apart as "one of the most welcoming cities in all of the United States. never mind Texas. I think the acceptance of people in general has refugees feeling very comfortable."

currently occupying Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, and Turkey. The massive influx of a desperate population has strained the economies of those nations. while the influx of refugees - both formally documented and those fleeing by any means necessary - has created political turmoil in Europe, feeding America's right-wing rhetoric.

The Obama administration has stepped up: In the past year, ending Oct. 31, the federal gov-

ernment accepted 13,697 Syrian refugees, exceeding the original target of 10,000. However, there remains a question about what happens moving forward. Presidentelect Donald Trump has talked about registering Muslims, while future Vice President Mike Pence attempted to block resettlement of refugees while he was governing Indiana. "We don't know what the Trump administration will do," said Kelley. "I don't want to even speculate, but we certainly are concerned, based on rhetoric."

anti-migrant, anti-refugee, anti-Muslim rhetoric is terrifying. "It frightens them," said Kelley. "We've seen refugees, particularly after the Paris attacks, who were afraid to leave their apartments. We had caseworkers explain to them that people are frightened: "They're afraid of your language; they're not afraid of you."

The Paris attacks also saw a ray of hope. Prior to that, RST held roughly 100 volunteers. Now, Kelley said, more than 1,300 Austinites have signed up to lend a hand, helping refugees with translation, accompanying them to the grocery store, filling out applications, or ferrying them to the doctor.

It's not like refugees are turning up unannounced. As Kelley noted, the U.S. refugee system is already one of the planet's most rigorous, with only 5% of all global refugees resettled within the nation. It can also seem arbitrary, since the U.S. picks who it even considers: Neither the Al-Hallaqs nor the Aladawis know why they were relocated to America while family members were sent to other countries.

It's a multi-year process of extensive background checks, which is tough; refugees are often unlikely to have documentation with them. The Aladawis fled without their passports, and were lucky enough to bring what is known as a family book – a legal document charting the entire family structure – to suffice as a replacement. Without that, the Aladawis would still be in Jordan. Kelley called the process "more stringent than an FBI background check. It involves everything from blood samples to iris scans to extensive documentation, where you've got to prove who you are and where you're from."

It's easy to get disqualified. Othman Al-Hallaq was questioned about whether he had been involved in the early protest marches, before the war. He told the assigned bureaucrats that he had, but mostly to keep his brother, a photographer, safe as he chronicled events. (That brother, he says with pride, is now a documentary filmmaker in Sweden.)

Kelley noted that the concentration on potential links to insurgent groups has proved particularly burdensome and dangerous for refugees from Afghanistan and Iraq, and in particular for military translators. These locals often risked their lives to assist U.S. forces, but they find themselves stranded because of the shifting regional alliances. "The relationships aren't neat over there," he said. "An interpreter or translator could have known somebody who knows somebody who knows a terrorist."

Yet once they are through those hoops, that's where government involvement pretty much stops, and groups like RST step in. Their job isn't just scheduling and checks. It is, Kelley explained, about giving them the life skills to make it day-to-day in America: How to call 911. When to call 911. How to navigate a grocery store. "Car insurance is really hard to figure out for some refugees," reminded Kelley, "in terms of 'Why do I have to pay that much?""

TURKISH PURGINGS

Not every refugee is a stranger to the U.S., or even fits the legal, technical definition of a refugee. There is another class of refugee: here legally, on either a visa or a green card, but still fleeing oppression. Over the last few months, there has been an influx of Turks into the U.S., fleeing the massive crackdown on opponents of the government of President Recep Erdogan. At its core, their plight is the same as that of Syrian refugees. There is that shared fear for what is happening in their ancestral homelands, 7,000 miles away. Their experiences have been polar opposites.

Indeed, the high-ceilinged two-story home in North Austin could not seem farther away from the small apartments that house the Al-Hallaqs and Aladawis. Rather than the donated furniture and art, there are comfortable couches. The word "Istanbul" is lovingly picked out in calligraphy and framed with pride of place.

In between sips of tea from an ornately patterned glass, and bites from a plate of bulgur wheat and potato pie, Yusuf clicks through a website, www.turkeypurge.com. (For the safety of their families, the *Chronicle* has agreed to use pseudonyms for Turkish refugees.) The site was founded by journalists attempting to track the oppression, and the numbers are staggering. Over 100,000 people have been fired from their jobs, including over 6,000 academics and nearly 4,000 judges and prosecutors. 78,000 people have been detained, 37,000 arrested, including 145 journalists. Thousands of schools and universities have closed.

The purge came after a failed coup in July. The target has been the Gülenists – adherents to the teachings of Turkish philosopher and social activist Muhammed Fethullah Gülen. In the Nineties, the Gülen movement (more technically known as Hizmet, meaning "service," and a reflection of the commitment to civic engagement) was allied with Erdogan's Justice and Development Party. Now Erdogan has blamed rogue Gülenists as the cause of Turkey's problems.

Berat doesn't believe it. He came to the U.S. almost three decades ago to study engineering at the University of Texas, and has established a distinguished career. He calls the failed July coup "extremely convenient" for Erdogan: Before the coup, his administration was crumbling, wracked with allegations of corruption at the highest level. All those have disappeared as he has taken absolute control, and suppressed all opposition. Berat said: "Three hours into the coup attempt, when the F-16s were in the air, he was at the airport, giving a statement to the press, saying this was a gift from God to us."

Anyone even peripherally attached to Hizmet is now persona non grata in Turkey, and anyone with the means has fled. Most, said Berat, have gone east to Georgia or north to Bosnia, but those with green cards or U.S. visas have gone to America. So far, they know of 17 Turkish families in Austin alone. Two of them are staying with Berat. "Fortunately, he had a green card," Berat said of one of his guests. "So he found a job in a gas station, but they know zero English. So we've been trying to help them."

Having that access to legal employment, and the support network of the existing Turkish population, is vital. There is no government aid for them. "These people are not officially classified as refugees," said Berat. "They are just people who have run away."

The one positive for Turkish families is that they are already here – already established, already employed and secure. If more Turks manage to escape the crackdown, or if the U.S. starts accepting Turkish refugees, they are well positioned to greet their fellow nationals when they arrive.

It's more uncertain times for the Syrian families, the Al-Hallaqs and Aladawis. Their kids are all enrolled in AISD schools, and the men are now looking for jobs. Othman is optimistic: He and Hanan were both taking English classes, but he dropped out so he could concentrate on applying for work. Mohammed Aladawi remains determined but less upbeat. He recounts one service industry job he applied for: He had to supply a medical note to prove he was fit for work. He did, and then the hiring firm told him he had to speak English.

The kids face that language difficulty, too. Not only are they trying to learn English, but most of their classmates speak Spanish, so they are struggling to be trilingual. It's easier on the little ones, both families agree, but for the teens in high school, that's a lot of adjustments to make.

It's hard to see the footage from Syria. Aleppo and its 7,000 years of history have been pounded into rubble, and neither family has a clear idea what is happening in their smaller hometowns, away from the struggling eye of the media and the tender mercies of nongovernmental organizations. "Kids are getting killed," said Othman, "and they have nothing to do with this horror. The most important thing is for this war to stop."

But there are high points. The families have made friends in the neighborhood, and in the local Syrian community. Othman said their goal is to integrate and assimilate. Most importantly, the kids are in school, and they love the nearby duck pond.

"That's why we left," said Othman. "We want them to be safe, and to have a good life."

They are winter-bloomers, but the foliage looks great year-round as long as you leave them alone. Don't repot and don't overwater.

Also, if you have a cat who is hellbent on eating your houseplants, hanging plants from the ceiling is your best option, and the macramé itself can be a great design element.

People With Issues: A 49-year-old man was partly exonerated by a court in southern Sweden in September when he convinced the judge that he had a severe anxiety attack every time he received an "official" government letter in the mail (known as "window envelopes" in Sweden). Thus, though he was guilty of DUI and several other minor traffic offenses while operating his scooter, the judge dropped the charge of driving without a license because the man never opened the string of "frightening" letters informing him that operating a scooter requires a license.

Democracy in Action

While "democracy" in most of America means electing representatives to run government, on Nov. 8 in San Francisco it also expected voters to decide 43 often vague, densely worded "issues" that, according to critics, could better be handled by the professionals who are, after all, elected by those very same voters. Except for hot-button issues like tax increases or hardened legislative gridlock, solutions on these "propositions" (e.g., how certain contractors' fees should be structured, which obscure official has primary responsibility for which obscure job, or the notorious proposition asking whether actors in the tax-paying porn industry must use condoms) would be, in other states, left to elected officials, lessening voter need for a deep dive into civics.

Police Report

Inexplicable: 1) The police chief of Bath Township, Ohio, acknowledged the overnight break-in on Oct. 10 or 11 at the University Hospitals Ghent Family Practice, but said nothing was missing. It appeared that an intruder (or intruders) had performed some medical procedure in a clinical office (probably on an ear) because instruments were left in bowls and a surgical glove and medication wrappings tossed into a trash can (and a gown left on a table). 2) A 35-year-old man was detained by police in Vancouver, British Columbia, in October after a home break-in in which the intruder took off his clothes, grabbed some eggs, and began preparing a meal. The homeowner, elsewhere in the house, noticed the commotion and the intruder fled (still naked).

How to Tell If You've Had Too Much to Drink: Ashley Basich, 49, was arrested in Cheyenne, Wyo., in October and charged with DUI after police found her, late at night, using an industrial forklift to pick up and move a van that she explained was blocking her driveway. Problems: She works for the state forestry department and had commandeered a state-owned vehicle, she had a cooler of beer in the forklift and was operating it while wearing flip-flops (OSHA violation!), and the van "blocking" her driveway was her own.

Though most Chicago Police Department officers get no more than five civilian complaints in their entire careers (according to one defense attorney), CPD internal records released in October reveal that some had more than 100, and, of 13,000 complaints over 47 years in which police wrongdoing was conceded, only 68 cases resulted in the officer actually being fired (although the worst police offender, Jerome Finnigan, with 157 complaints over two decades, is now in federal prison).

Compelling Explanations: Two men in rural Coffee County, Ga., told sheriff's deputies in November that they had planned to soon attack a science-research center in Alaska because peoples' "souls" were trapped there and needed to be released (or at least that is what God told Michael Mancil, 30, and James Dryden Jr., 22, causing them to amass a small, but "something out of a movie" arsenal, according to the sheriff). The High Frequency Active Aural Research Facility, run by the University of Alaska Fairbanks, has long been a target of conspiracists, in that "the study of the Earth's atmosphere" obviously, they say, facilitates "mind control," snatching souls. Well, Of Course! 1) Motorist Luke Campbell, 28, was arrested near Minneapolis in September and charged with firing his gun at several passing cars, wounding one man (a bus passenger) – explaining to a bystander that shooting at other vehicles "relieves stress." 2) Briton Mark Wright, 45, caught with illegal drugs taped to his penis following his arrest for burglary, told Newcastle Crown Court in September that he had "hidden" them there to keep them secret from his wife (perhaps identifying one place that she no longer visits).

Leading Economic Indicators

Recent Hospital Bills: 1) Paula D'Amore claimed she deserved a discount from the \$7,400 "delivery room" charge for the April birth of her daughter at Boca Raton (Florida) Regional Hospital – because the baby was actually born in the backseat of her car in the hospital's parking lot. (Nurses came out to assist D'Amore's husband in the final stages, but, said D'Amore, only the placenta was delivered inside.) 2) In October, new father Ryan Grassley balked at the \$39.95 line-item charge from Utah Valley Hospital (Provo, Utah) - for the mother's holding her new C-section son momentarily to her bare chest (a "bonding" ritual). (Doctors countered that C-section mothers are usually drugged and require extra security during that ritual – but that Utah Valley might rethink making that charge a "line item.")

Least Competent Criminals

Jacob Roemer, 20, was arrested in Negaunee Township, Mich., after a brief chase on Oct. 29 following an attempted home invasion. The resident had confronted him, chasing Roemer into the woods, where a State Police dog eventually found him lying on the ground unconscious and bloody, after, in the darkness, running into a tree and knocking himself out.

Recurring Themes

1) The most recent case in which an unlucky cannabis grower came to police attention occurred in Adelaide, Australia, in August when a motorist accidentally veered off the road and crashed into a grow house, collapsing part of a wall. Arriving police peered inside and quickly began a search for the residents, who were not at home. 2) The latest market price for a coveted automobile license plate is apparently the equivalent of \$9 million – the amount paid by Dubai developer Balwinder Sahni at government auction recently for plate number "5."

Readers' Choice

For not the first time in history, a fire broke out this year in a hospital operating room caused by the patient's passing gas during a laser procedure. The patient at Tokyo Medical University Hospital, in her 30s, suffered burns across her legs in the April incident, which was finally reported in the Japanese press in October when the hospital completed its investigation.

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

Just South of Overwhelming

Blue Genie Art Bazaar shifts its longtime holiday gift emporium to a new space across from ACC Highland

As I write these words, the interior of Blue Genie's new Art Bazaar space looks like an abandoned warehouse riddled with a maze of naked room dividers. By the time you read this – probably on the weekend of what everyone calls Black Friday – that space at 6100 Airport is going to look like the professionally produced wonderscape of fantastic art and craft that you likely recall from the bazaar's many previous incarnations.

That's the idea, anyway, and it's an idea that we're willing to bet will reach fruition, even in just a week's time. Because the Blue Genie crew, they don't tend to chill.

"We've always operated on trust," says Art Bazaar co-honcho Dana Younger, standing on the venue's recently completed entrance deck with its well-designed combo of wooden stairs and ramps. "We decide what we want to do, then *trust* that it's gonna work out. And then we work like hell. We bust our asses to make things happen." "And what the hell else are we gonna do?" asks Kevin Collins, Blue Genie jefe grande. "This," he says, "this is what feeds us."

The Blue Genie Art Bazaar started back in 2001, when Blue Genie Art Industries, the company that creates giant art and commercial sculptures - the Fran's hamburger girl, those armadillos swarming the entrance of Threadgill's World HQ, the Bullock Texas State History Museum's immense bas-relief facade, and so many others - decided to host a sort of employeegenerated holiday gift shop in its Springdale Road workspace. And, given the folks involved and the things they created, that pop-up market was an instant success - and became increasingly popular, year after year, until it outgrew its Springdale britches and stepped into an annual gig at the Marchesa at Lincoln Village. That was in 2006, and so we've grown used to the Blue Genie presence there, a presence decked out with offerings from more than 200 local artists and designers. But now, after nine years, they've moved again.

If you want to blame somebody for that move, citizen, you can blame the Austin Film Society. But the Blue Genie people don't blame them. The four partners here – Collins and Younger, along with Rory Skagen and Chris Coakley – are closer to thanking the AFS for a new opportunity.

"When AFS took over the space," says Younger, "it was a surprise; we didn't know it was coming – but they were super nice about it. They were like, 'Okay, we're renovating the space in November, and you can't be in here. And we love you guys, you can come back, but you'll have less space.' And that didn't work out for us – it didn't feel

right to reduce the amount of space we were using. So we decided to look around and find a new home."

"We're definitely celebrating the Austin Film Society," Collins concurs. "With Salvage Vanguard and Rude Mechs and so many other arts organizations struggling right now, it was a small win for this whole town that AFS is actually going through an *expansion* and gaining a theatre."

"Our friend and Realtor Mishell Kneeland helped us out with this space," says Younger. "We wanted to be in this general area, and so when she found this one, we walked in and were like, 'Yes! We'll *take* it!' Despite the fact that it was full to the ceiling with cubicle walls from TOPS storage. At that point, we could get about 10 feet into the space."

Collins grins, remembering. "Yeah," he says, "it was a little grubby, but we saw its potential. And the idea of continuity is important to us – staying in this area is important. And this whole neighborhood, Crestview, is very, very popular. Plus, it's got an Airport Boulevard address, and people *know* Airport, so I think they'll be comforted by that. 'Oh yeah, the Art Bazaar is still in the same basic area.' Hell, for years people have been showing up to the old Springdale address – and now Blue Genie's not even *there* anymore." (See "Blue Genie Art Industries Is Moving," March 29, for *that* story.)

"The bazaar is definitely *not* at 916 Springdale!" says Younger.

"With this space," says Collins, "the Airport Boulevard address is powerful. And we're across the street from what's become ACC Highland. Dana was just telling me that the entire ACC Art Department is moving from Rio Grande to here. We're already in talks with them about a faculty exhibition in this new space."

"There will be no shortage of opportunities of things to do here," says Younger.

Well, no, there's seldom a shortage of opportunities of things-to-do *anywhere* in Austin. What there is, more often, is a shortage of funding. But that's not something the mighty Blue Genie has to concern itself with, right? Because this new space is less expensive than the previous arrangement at the Marchesa?

"Oh, no," says Younger with a chuckle. "No, we're paying significantly more here. This is a stretch, but it's gonna work out. The community has a lot of needs and a lot of ideas, and it's gonna work out. But we *are* making a leap of faith."

The leap of faith at 6100 Airport comprises 11,000 square feet of display area (and a bar, of course, to better fuel the tradi-

tional opening party) which will be filled with wares from the usual suspects and more. "We typically take on 20 to 25 percent new artists each year," says Collins. "It helps maintain the health of the show, and it's always interesting for us to see the new talent that's out there."

("This is my first year participating in the bazaar," says Philip Edgerton of EdgeWorks

Design, whose touch-activated industrial lamps are made of metal parts salvaged from Austin scrap yards. "I've been showing my creations at a few galleries and during the EAST/WEST studio tours, and I think this new Blue Genie space is going to be great. It's easier to find, parking will be better, and I think the one-big-room layout will be less confusing to customers."

"I've been doing the art bazaar on and off

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since 2007," says sculptor Alejandra Almuelle. "The people that put it together, the way they organize and advertise, they make it very easy for the artists in the show.")

And that leap of faith is, after all, springboarded by a company that's not hurting for economic support. "Right now we're doing a giant Lucky Cat for a ramen house in Houston," says Collins, "and rebuilding an architectural capital for the first bank that ever opened in Texas, back in the 1890s: The capital and facade blew off in a hurricane in the 1950s, so we're fixing that. And we just took a stab at a 15-foot-tall football robot for Fox Sports, for the Super Bowl. So, yeah, Blue Genie's doing just fine."

> And they're doing fine to the point of welcoming Austinites, starting on Friday, Nov. 25, to the latest incarnation of their annual gift emporium - which, if these boon fellows are to be believed, will be even bigger and better and giftier than ever.

"Hopefully it won't be too overwhelming for people," says Collins, surveying the activity the arrangings, the hammerings, the drillings, the sandings, the polish-

ings - going on within the cavernous venue. Younger nods, years of experience in building things agleam in his brown eyes. "Yeah," he says, "we try to stay just south of overwhelming."



Lifted by wonderful performances, Austin Shakespeare's take on Present Laughter is a delight to watch

No matter the role, it cannot be argued that the main job of an actor is to commit. And no one commits more fully than Garry Essendine. A veteran of the stage. Essendine has mastered the art of believability to such a degree that he has begun taking his work (and every willing lady he comes across) home with him. To this most apt of players, all the world's a stage littered with ciga-

rettes, fine liquor, forgotten latchkeys, and wanton women.

Noël Coward's Present Laughter opens with Mr. Essendine's latest (and perhaps youngest) conquest, one Daphne

Stillington, traipsing through his lavish living room. As the wide-eyed debutante (played by Corinna Browning) sits down to coffee and orange juice, we begin to deduce, through the actions of Mr. Essendine's staff, that this walk of shame is not an isolated incident.

And indeed, it is not. Garry's multiple indiscretions are piling up, and the onus falls on his trusty house help, his snarky secre-

tary, and his estranged wife to clean up his myriad messes. As his admirers multiply and alibis start to unravel, Essendine finds himself a dog dragged ever closer to his proverbial day. Under incredible pressure, he decides honesty is his only option. But

there's a problem: When Garry Essendine finally stops acting and starts Rollins Studio Theatre at the Long Center, 701 W. Riverside speaking in earnest, no one believes him.

Austin Shakespeare's take on this comedy classic features some truly

wonderful performances. As Garry Essendine, Marc Pouhé embodies commitment. His combination of flawlessly executed comic timing, seamless transitions from one big emotion to another, and willingness to give himself fully to each moment of the story showcases

his talent superbly. Pouhé, much like Garry Essendine, is an actor's actor, and his performance is one that Coward (who originated the role) would be proud of. Babs George carries herself with the strength, grace, and ease of a 1940s screen siren. In Liz Essendine, she has created a smart, savvy, quick-witted, and committed companion to Garry.

Ironically, in certain moments, some of the performers in Present Laughter miss the mark as far as commitment goes. Haphazard smoking, inconsistent accent work, and careless stage action can remove one, albeit temporarily, from the story at hand. Furthermore, while

Coward's dialogue is best served at a brisk clip, some of the lines are thrown at the audience so quickly that they are lost. However, despite these few directorial hiccups, the cast recovers quickly, and overall the show is a delight to watch.

From beginning to end, Present Laughter is an exploration of show business, success, and the absurd lengths someone will go to in order to get what they want and get away scot-free. Artistic Director Ann Ciccolella and Austin Shakespeare have created a pleasant evening of theatre that you should absolutely commit to see.

RAMBUNCTIOUS: A FESTIVAL OF AMERICAN COMPOSERS & DANCE McCullough Theatre, 2375 Robert Dedman Nov. 17

Sigh, America – what can our country's artists tell us about ourselves? Spectrum Dance Theater, based in Seattle and headed by revered contemporary choreographer Donald Byrd, joined the top-notch New York-based Aeolus Quartet at the University of Texas for two performances of Byrd's dances to music by American composers. The dances were as varied as the music by Charles Ives, Aaron Copland, Vincent Persichetti, Charles Wuorinen, and Yevgeniy Sharlat. And while, yes, those are a bunch of white guys (Jews and immigrants included), it's worth noting that Byrd is a black man and his company looks, racially, like America, which makes the work all the more rich and credible.

Unfortunately, I missed the first work on the program, the ensemble piece "Fanfare!," danced to lves, but I slipped in just in time for the duet "Solo/Duo," a cheerful, energetic romp in sneakers to Copland. In the third work, "I from myself am banish'd," a quartet whose title is a line from Christopher Marlowe's Edward II, Byrd skillfully alluded to Graham and Balanchine via Persichetti's String Quartet No. 2, Op. 24. The dance was austere, costumed in grays, with pummeling fists and arms constrained to the sides, vet aspiration was not quashed; jumps grew higher and higher, and the dancers moved together on a diagonal, toward a ray of light. After intermission, "Septet" was a deep dive into Aeolus' alert performance of Wuorinen's dynamic String Quartet No. 2. Although the dancers were costumed in black and white, their dancing, shape-shifting between the balletic and the athletic, rendered the music, with its lilting ruminations, burbling pizzicato, and explosions of slicing bows, in hypercolor.

The program closed with an exciting double premiere: a new dance by Byrd to new music by Sharlat, who is on the faculty at the Butler

School of Music. Sharlat was born in Moscow and immigrated to the United States in the mid-Nineties, and in a way, it seems that his vibrant, bittersweet String Quartet No. 4 could only have come from the wide-frame, complex experiences of an immigrant. Light and dark weren't opposites but, rather, shades of a single phenomenon. Midway through the piece, one of the violinists produced a harmonica, whose sounds were emulated by the remaining strings. Soon after, the harmonica was replaced with a kazoo, its brazen childishness eventually devolving into something like an alarm, fading in and out from behind the strings.

By the end of the piece, all four musicians were on kazoos, harmonizing a tune that was both haunting and ridiculous, in a heartbreaking, charming sort of way. The dance, Byrd's "August 1, 1966," confirmed that this was an elegy. Spectrum's ensemble of 13 dancers, wearing soft fabrics in shades of gray, seemed to pause time to explore the emotions that resonate from the terrible day when Charles Whitman shot 49 people from the University of Texas clock tower – and, by association, the terror, anxiety, and mourning of similarly dark days in American civil history. Groups dared to move only in a chain, linked by hands held fast. Solos mourned lost innocence, and duets considered the futility of intimacy. The piece ended with the ensemble lying on their backs, hands trembling in the air, suggesting, perhaps, that there are parts of us that can't move on from such a terrible blow. Given the misogyny, racism, anti-intellectualism, and corruption currently infiltrating our government, how many of us, paralyzed by fear and betraval, can relate? We need intelligent, experienced artists like Byrd and Sharlat more than ever – step right up, and get your tickets. 

"VIVID STROKES: CONTEMPORARY PAINTINGS FROM VIETNAM" Asian American Resource Center, 8401 Cameron, 512/974-1700 www.austintexas.gov/aarc Through Dec. 30

In our tumultuous moment, it is important to keep perspective. One way to do that is to look at other, more tumultuous times and places. The Asian American Resource Center's "Vivid Strokes: Contemporary Paintings From Vietnam" gives us that opportunity. The six artists represent very different outlooks on the Vietnamese experience, especially as it pertains to the effects of the Vietnam War. For his part, Ha Tri Hieu chooses to focus on the Vietnamese countryside, to which he was evacuated from Hanoi during the war. In Reflection, a large, unidentifiable red animal hangs upside down from what looks like a strip of grass. Two country girls stand on either side of the animal with their mouths open, calling out or singing as the animal looks on. The image is haunting, an effect that is emphasized by the empty background, like a Marcel Dzama illustration. The singing girls show up again in Hieu's Three Country Girls, which features another unrecognizable creature – a cow? – behind three girls with the same open mouths hallooing to the heavens. The paintings are giddy, but they are also somber, as though the country people contain some crucial knowledge we no longer have access to.

It is difficult to tell if Doan Hoang Lam's work is more celebratory or foreboding. In Dragon Dance, a crowd of muddy figures huddles at the bottom of a gray canvas, marching like zombies while holding a yellow dragon aloft. The presumably inanimate dragon is coiled at sharp angles, its jaws opened wide. It is so bright that it makes the otherwise morose canvas seem uplifting, as if the people, having suffered, are still able to cheer for something. That perception is compromised, however, as the brilliance of the dragon also serves to highlight the dimness of the people. Like Hieu, Lam was born in Hanoi, which he remembers as "poor, undeveloped, [with] moldy walls and tiny alleys, [and] dim lights

that fade at the end of long dark streets." That dismal description seems apt to the crowd in *Dragon Dance*, though coupled with the dragon, some hope (perhaps false) shines through.

I've been watching Bob Ross on Netflix lately. His "happy tree" scenes put me at ease, but not the way Hong Viet Dung's River at Dawn does. A river bordered by fogenshrouded trees flows so slowly it seems still. The river, trees, and sky are tinted various shades of yellow. A small raft floats in the foreground. Landscapes used to be among my least favorite genres, but now I take solace from them. An image of rolling green hills or a mountain forest invites me to picture myself within it, and what had once been boring for me - "There's nothing happening!" - became a way for me to get away from the stupid, tedious monotonies and savageries of everyday life. With River at Dawn Dung calls on Buddhist meditation practice to enable the viewer an escape onto a peaceful water, at the center of a radiant country that gleams like a halo. This escape is precious. At a time when so much in our own country seems chaotic and menacing, it may be enlightening - and comforting - to look to the work of those whose countries have seen tragedy that we in the United States cannot imagine. We may have entered a black era in American politics, but human history is long, and others have gone before us. This is one of the great powers of art: to document our collective experience, so that we may learn from it. - Sam Anderson-Ramos

San Saba River

Nature Park in San Saba opens a pecan forest to the public for exploring and enjoying. In season, the tasty nuts litter the paved hiking path like forgotten Easter eggs.

Claiming the title of "Pecan Capital of the World," the town was the birthplace of the modern pecan industry in Texas. We have Edmund E. Risien to thank for many



of the improved varieties of the state nut that make delicious pies and candies. A cabinetmaker from England, Risien landed in San Saba in 1874 on his way to California. One of many projects before his death in 1940 was to improve on the small native pecan. Risien found a pecan tree that became the mother tree of more important varieties than any other pecan tree in the world. Descendants of Risien still own his orchard and sell pecans and baked goods under the Millican Pecan Company brand not far from the nature park.

The 40-acre park contains the remains of the town's first waterworks. A 1.5-mile hikeand-bike trail winds through pecan trees to a fishing area and several historical sites along the San Saba River. The trail also leads to Risien Park, a gift to the town from the talented horticulturist. Some of the bridges over Mill Creek are former railroad cars.

San Saba River Nature Park is east of the county courthouse off U.S. 190. It is owned by the LCRA and is open from sunrise to sunset.

HORNS FAIL TO WREAK HAVOC IN BROOKLYN

Shaka Smart has one of the youngest teams (and starting lineups) of any Power Five conference school, and yet the Texas program is expected to take a step forward. The agile No. 23 Texas Longhorns came into 2016-17 stacked with long and lean talent, equipped to run Smart's vaunted "havoc" - a stifling,

pit bull brand of defense, involving picking up and trapping from anywhere on the court.

Sophomore guards **Kerwin Roach Jr.** and **Eric Davis Jr.** are expected to be coaches on the floor. It'll be critical for the duo to progress into higher percentage three-point shooters, to go along with their apparent leadership and defensive doggedness. **Tevin Mack** (17.0 ppg, 55% 3p%) and **Kendal Yancy** are taking steps forward from the wing. As potential lottery picks, both the explosive guard **Andrew Jones** and center **Jarrett Allen** have had their way with lesser competition to start the season.

Smart's desired defensive effect seemed to have taken hold. Off to a much better start than last year's 2-3 stumble, the Horns were trending in the right direction, now. They'd yet to have a true measuring stick at this early juncture, not having faced any bigger, more skilled teams on the road. That changed on Monday night.

Coming off dominating back-to-back 20-plus-point wins over Louisiana-Monroe and Eastern Washington, they squared off against their best competition on Monday night, bullied into a 77-58 loss to (former Duke Blue Devil) **Chris Collins**-led Northwestern Wildcats at the 10th annual Legends Classic at the Barclays Center, Brooklyn, N.Y.



The tourney's Big 10 representative, expected to be middle of the pack of their conference, brought physicality and pushed the Horns around from tip – quickly building a 10-1 lead to start, and closed the first half with a 9-0 run. Particularly effective in the paint. Northwestern shot well - 48% FG, 42%

3p%, and 13-16 from the line. Junior guards **Scottie Lindsey** and **Bryant McIntosh** scored a combined 36 points, going 5-14 from three.

Aside from a respectable performance by sophomore Tevin Mack, who led with 18 points off the bench, Texas' guards typically found themselves pounding the ball in isolation, and then usually drove into the chests of Wildcat defenders. Other times, Texas wasted possessions by casually walking through sets and forcing post-ups with burly senior forward Shaquille Cleare and super frosh Jarrett Allen, who were mostly ineffective from the low blocks. Spacing became an issue, as Northwestern lacked respect for Texas' long-range shooting. Not helping themselves when they drew fouls. Texas made only 13 of 27 free throws.

Lacking Smart's brand of connectedness, Texas struggled defensively for large stretches, playing tight, feet in quicksand. Smart suggested his young squad played like a team not quite ready for the prime time. "I was a little bit concerned this morning because sometimes you can feel when guys get in the bright lights, you can tell they're playing a little bit away from what really goes into it," Smart said. "It's natural. I think we were a step off with a lot of things we know how to do." — Kahron Spearman

Review: Picnik

PALEO-FRIENDLY CONCEPT IS VIRTUOUS BUT NOT HOLIER-THAN-THOU

It speaks to a certain sickness in our society that we now place more faith into what we put in our mouths than what we put in our mind. If religion has largely been reduced to a buffet line, and science has been too polluted with the ingredients of belief, food now offers the rigor and ceremony left by that vacancy – the miracles promised far more astounding than a mere talking donkey.

The problem is that once a diet is named, once word is made flesh, it falls into theological traps, allowing little room for nuance or exploration. Some things are indisputably good and some things are indisputably bad. One's worth as a person is determined by how strictly one follows those rules. It's no coincidence that we speak of food now in terms of moral imperative (do a Google search for Freelee the Banana Girl for the more entertaining side of that), and that veering off that path now creates the same guilt as failing to live up to a Commandment.

Picnik, the brick-and-mortar version of the popular South Austin trailer, definitely plays to food cultists, but refreshingly avoids giving them a church. Although owner Naomi Seifter's specific food allergies were reportedly the reason for forming the business, there is a sort of food non-denominationalism at play. The menu by executive chef Dan Salivar and consultant Justin Turner eliminates gluten, corn, soy, and peanuts, and is primarily paleo-friendly (at least in the broader interpretations), but it doesn't strictly adhere to any one system of eating, offering a full range of options for everyone from vegans to Whole30 adherents. Perhaps because of all the various diets that the restaurant caters to, the servers are able to rattle off what goes into, say, an ice cream sandwich with ease, lifting the level of service.

Some lifting is done by the interior, too. The space resolutely refuses to look like a health food restaurant. McCray & Co. (Lenoir, Ramen Tatsu-Ya, Taco Flats), replaced the jewel tones of previous occupant Fork & Taco, washing the space in watercolor blues and cottage whites. The two sides of the restaurant are clearly delineated with a bookshelf advertising Picnik's food thought bona fides. The fullservice side crowds in voguish Windsor chairs around a long, pillow-scattered banquette. The entrance area acts as a counter service hub and coffeehouse hangout (the various butter coffees are a draw even if one never dines

a draw even if one never dines there) with houseplants and marshmallow leather couches beckoning to bring them your tired, your poor, your allergic. The ease was somewhat

spoiled by a mini-plague of fruit flies on one visit, but once the spastic swatting subsided, it took little time to settle into the menu. With very specific rules in play, the food works best when kept simple. The harvest hash (\$15.95), full of brussels sprouts, sweet potato, apple, pecans, and a poached egg, is dressed with a balanced maple vinaigrette. The fried brussels sprouts (\$8.95) – topped with crisped pork belly and parmesan – and the beef stew (\$12.75 – braised with green beans and potatoes – are both comfort classics. And the chicken tenders (\$11.75), just that with a honey mustard aïoli, will appeal to more sophisticated kids or less mature sophisticates. The salads are solid as well, especially the Cobb (\$16.95), which replaces the traditional red wine vinaigrette with a creamy dressing that splits the difference between Caesar and green goddess.

The breakfast fare meets the mark as well. Start with one of the rich butter coffees. Drinks like the candy cane mocha (\$7.50) and pumpkin spice latte (\$6.25) eschew the chemical sludge of similar beverages with essential oils and actual spice, making it hard to return to more commercial versions. The breakfast tacos (\$6.25-6.95), made with Siete almond flour tortillas, are satisfying, particularly the well-seasoned chorizo version. The French toast (\$12) indulges in a mixedfruit jam and mascarpone. And the pastries taste like they give no consideration to health whatsoever - especially the blondie made with coconut sugar and almond meal. Tasty alone, it especially sung in the aforementioned ice cream sandwich (\$6.95) made with Dolce Neve vanilla gelato.

Unfortunately, the kitchen was not as assured with the more complicated dishes. The exception was the shrimp risotto (\$18.95), a luxurious mixture of butternut squash, asparagus, and cremini mushrooms scented with woodsy thyme. But other "marketplates" (assumably their word for entrées) were not so fully developed. Most of those stumbles were the type of thing that would simply be ignored if coming from the home chef, but proved somewhat irritating at Picnik's price point. The bulgogi lettuce wraps (\$11.75), although a tad too sweet for my palate, let a pleasingly peppery ssäm sauce do most of the heavy lifting, robbing the dish of needed complexity. A longer pickling process for the daikon and carrot and some assertive garlic would have made the difference between a "meh" and a "hmm." Plus, the hot mixture wilted the Bibb lettuce and the jasmine rice was a touch dry, giving the dish textural dissonance. The catch of the day (\$22.95 market price) – a black drum – had the benefit of a polished beurre blanc. That hid most of the dish's sins, including the overcooked, slightly rubbery fish, but the scoop of parsnip puree overpowered the milder flavors. On the opposite spectrum, it was difficult to suss out any flavor from the

eggplant rollatini (\$15.95) at all – the bland cashew/cauliflower ricotta filling zapping most of the finesse.

I suspect those details will improve with some time and stability in the kitchen. The flavors of the rollatini, for one,

developed overnight and made great leftovers. While I'm not quite yet ready to throw up my hands and scream hallelujah, I do recognize that Picnik is a godsend to folks like my highly allergic mother or my celiac childhood friend. And they make one hell of a mezcal Old Fashioned (\$11) should all that virtue get in the way. – Brandon Watson

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
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Czech Your Privilege

Austin is the pilsner capital of America

I spent my entire week drinking pilsners. And when not drinking them, I was writing about them, thinking about them in ways intellectuals would ponder Ovid's *Metamorphoses*, researching their heatslaying characteristics like an indie A&R rep, and generally admiring beer walls all over town.

Now you might be thinking, "Pilsners are fool's gold, man. The very cornerstone of Big Beer and spineless fuckery like boneless buffalo wings and Twenty One Pilots." And while that is all very true, over the past halfdecade or so, the craft beer pendulum has swung from big, barrel-aged thuggery to approachable, sessionable, and sensible styles that are made simply, if not beautifully.

That is pilsner. No, that is a craft pilsner. In the next few months you will get a drip-feeding about how pilsners are going to set your world alight, how fringe enthusiasm for these lagers are now the trendiest style in craft beer because, as uncomplicated as they are, pilsners are still challenging beers to make. You are going to read about the freckled landscape of pilsner-brewing Americans from Tennessee to New Mexico. But Austin is already there. Always has been. The rest of the country is just playing catch-up.

"The Texas heat gave us no choice," says Dusan Kwiatkowski, head brewer at Live Oak, a brewery nationally regarded for its crisp German-style lagers, including their year-rounder, Pilz. "As a pilsnerphile," Kwiatkowski declares, "something you definitely notice when traveling the United States is the lack [of pilsners]. The East Coast has a decent offering, but has only recently come online. Texas' German and Czech heritage speaks strongly [about the region's brewing culture], from Pearl Brewing's foundation [in the 1880s] to the last 20 years of Live Oak Pilz."

"I think the pilsner beer being made in Austin right now is truly special," says



Jester King owner Jeffrey Stuffings. "Live Oak Pilz in particular achieves such beautiful balance of rich malt character, firm bitterness, and utter drinkability. While there's really fantastic pilsners being made all over the U.S. right now, I think Austin would be in the running [for pilsner capital] ... we're lucky to have one of the very best

pilsners in the world ... with Live Oak Pilz." Whereas once Shiner Bock – also a lager, albeit a dark one – was the de facto beer icon in Austin, in large part

because of the appetite of UT students for the budgetfriendly dollar beers on Sixth Street, the high tide of transplants rolling into Austin over the last two decades have mixed their ideologies of what it meant to "act like a Texan" with the shrinking population of indigenous locals. What was once dominated by a dark, malted longneck in a dance hall has converted to a refreshing, golden tin of pilsner on the disc golf course or the tailgate lot.

"Austin will drink almost 700,000 pints and 1.3 million cans of our Pearl Snap pilsner this year," claims Michael Graham, co-founder of Austin Beerworks. "It is a testament to local appreciation of the style. All that and we still make up less than 2 percent of the Austin beer scene. [It's a] thirsty town. Releasing another pilsner is something we have talked about."

[Austin is] definitely becoming – if not already – the pilsner capital of America," says Josh

Hare, founder and owner of Hops & Grain Brewery. "Our approach to the pilsner style

... was guided quite a bit by our commitment and devotion to Weyermann malts out of Bamberg, Germany, [and their varietal] called Barke I truly believe that a solid pilsner is built on the back of its base malt, [and] without that solid foundation it can feel either flat and empty or too sweet and

malty. The best pilsner makers in our great city seem to embrace time and balance as their guiding principles."

Hare suggests that while pilsners are typically paired with rugged, outdoor experiences, the pilsner brewing process itself is delicate and subtle. "This is not a beer for standard two-row malt or Cascade hops. The approach to malt and hops should be simple and elegant," Hare says. Austin's patio culture plays a part too. "Pilsners help build community in a way that [a style like] double IPA cannot," he continues. "Conversation and dialogue are the backbone of community [and] it's easier to have a really long conversation over a couple of pilsners and still maintain your mental focus."

"Some breweries out there are glomming on with psuedo-pils and faux-pils, but that's lame," says Brian "Swifty" Peters, coowner and head brewer at the Austin Beer Garden Brewing Co. "[The ABGB] wins [awards] because we are obsessed with lagers and have made it our mis-

sion to make world-class pilsners. I've been at it for 20 years, from the test batches of Live Oak Pilz to GABF (Great American Beer Festival) Gold for our Industry Pils."

This city tends to excessively self-congratulate, but the rest of the beer-drinking community appears to believe that there is at least some validity to Austin's claim as "pilsner capital of America." At the Great American Beer Festival, the beer industry's benchmark convention and awards coronation, Austin-area breweries medaled in at least one of the three pilsner categories in three out of the last five years, claiming two straight GABF gold medals for ABGB's Rocket 100 Pilsner in 2015, and Industry Pils in 2016, while also claiming a silver for Real Ale's Hans' Pils in 2012. The lagerfocused ABGB was also recognized as Large Brewpub of the Year, a remarkable achievement for a 3-year-old brewery.

"I'm not sure if medals are a good way of measuring a city's pilsner brewing prowess," says Peters. "Based on the number of pilsners brewed in each. I would think Austin wins. But I don't have data to back that up." A cursory count of local taps yielded 18 distinct local pilsners on tap

around town. Concurrently. Those are IPA-level numbers. "The funny thing is, ask most brewers what

they want to drink at the end of a shift and most say pilsners," says Peters. "Hans' Pils has developed a following that is really quite unique in our portfolio"

that is really quite unique in our portfolio", states Schmitty Schmitterson, production manager and head brewer at Real Ale Brewing Co. "I'm pretty sure it's the only beer of ours that has ever had an organized fan club on social media that was set up and run by our fans, not the brewery. It is also the only beer of ours that can claim a single handed tap takeover at a bar account. All 22 tap handles poured Hans', and the reach-in coolers were stocked with cans of Hans'. Now that is some love."

Schmitterson says that pilsners (and lagers overall) are perfect for the Central Texas climate with their clean, crisp profiles and refreshing finish that many people find appealing in Austin's ribaldry, nine-month heat wave. "We are fortunate in Austin to have a host of talented lager brewers pushing out world-class beers, and not limited to just a couple of breweries. I think that has helped develop the climate of lager love in Austin over the past few years."

And yet, as Austin is accustomed to do, there is even an element of "Keeping It Weird" with its local pilsners (a phrase coined in Austin, no matter how large Portland paints their letters). Blue Owl Brewing incorporates a sour-mashing technique to each one of their styles, leaving a unique, tart element. "Pilsners are really relevant to [Austin's] climate because they're clean, crisp, and refreshing," founder Jeff Young says. "I was excited to incorporate our sour process to our pilsner [Czech Czech] because it would enhance the refreshing character and show off our ability to make clean sourness part of a beer style you wouldn't normally see." Expanding

the spectrum of flavor for pilsner was important for Young in such a creative, pilsner-forward town. "[And] Live Oak even helped us out a bit," admits Young.

If Texas is truly able to become as synonymous with Czech and German pilsners as fried chicken is to Kentucky, all of the relevant elements appear to be present: Austin's ethnic and cultural calculus; the region's brewing history; its patio-drinking traditions, an homage to its sordid, unforgiving eight-month summer; its rustic and spicy cuisines which pair charmingly with effervescent lagers; and Austin's generally jovial demeanor, from street festivals to musical showcases.

"In beer classes I've taught in the past, I've always said that, to me, pilsner is the perfect style of beer and I'm on a quest to find the best one," says Tony Drewry, Texasrenowned "Beer Pedaler" and current staffer at Big Bend Brewery in Alpine. "Pilsners are a good litmus test for me. If a brewery makes a great pilsner, which isn't the easiest to nail, I'll probably like [the brewery], overall.

"Given the number of award-winning pilsners in Austin and some other top-notch ones equally deserving," concludes Drewry, "and with the style being very popular for brewers to brew and drinkers to drink, I'd say that I agree that Austin is the 'pilsner capital of America.""



Set sail with Moana, Disney's latest princess

Disney's latest couldn't have come at a better time, what with that as yet unbroken political glass ceiling and suchlike. Canny kids have at the very least an inkling of what's going on in the

real world, and the news of late has been rife with stories of children stricken by anxiety, fear, and a general sense of an adult world inexplicably turned upside down. The good news is that Moana is a wonderfully animated - in every sense of the word tale of youthful female empowerment that dazzles the eye with

Bombs away! The World War II espionage romance Allied is a big movie: big actors, big emotions, big gestures, big explosions, and a big ol' mess. Hearkening to an era of oldschool Hollywood filmmaking gone with the wind, it's a by-the-numbers prestige picture that strives mightily to capture the magic of a Forties Warner Bros. melodrama like Casablanca, a film it obsessively references like a kid emulating an idol in the hopes of becoming the ideal. In direct homage to the classic film, the first section of the movie takes place in the dusty Moroccan city circa 1942, after the Nazis have installed the pro-German Vichy government in the French protectorate. (At any moment, you half-expect Sydney Greenstreet to appear wearing a fez.) In this long introductory segment, the film's Bogey and Bergman stand-ins, Allied undercover agents Max Vatan (Pitt) and Marianne Beauséjour (Cotillard), pose as husband and wife to execute a bold mission that ultimately brings them together as actual spouses. Other overt references to the Oscar-winning

1942 film include an integral memory about a female French Resistance fighter who plays "Le Marseillaise" on the piano in defiance of a group of enemy soldiers, as well as a throwaway line in the finale that echoes Captain Renault's red herring order to round up the usual suspects. You could endorse this retro larceny if the movie halfway dignified its revered inspiration, but Allied is so full of itself it forgets to entertain most of the time. Here's so not looking at you, kid.

Viewing everything on a grand scale, director Zemeckis proves to be all wrong for this movie. At heart, the narrative is an intimate one with Hitchcockian overtones - is the woman our protagonist loves, the mother of his child, actually a German counterspy? – but he blows it up (both literally and figuratively) to magnify every imperfection in Steven Knight's undisciplined script, in which the germ of a compelling story exists but is lost. When things should get more emotionally focused in the third act, as Vatan desperately attempts to prove his wife's innocence, the film momentarily jumps the channel to become an action movie in occupied France of all things. And what's with the lip-locked lesbians and open cocaine use at the bohemian party

hosted by the fractured couple in their suburban London home, with British army intelligence personnel present, as the Blitzkrieg rages in the night sky above? (Sign me up!) While the always interesting Cotillard evokes a modicum of movie-star glamour as the film's woman of mystery, the stony-faced Pitt looks miserable from the start. The heads on Mount Rushmore have more range of expression than he does here. This may be the most depressing performance he's ever given in a film. Annus horribilis, indeed.


BAD SANTA 2

There's a difference between being transgressive and offensive, and that, in a nutshell (or roasted chestnut), is the difference between Bad Santa and Bad Santa 2. Released 13 years ago during Thanksgiving week, the first Bad Santa hit the screen with felonious glee. Now the sequel. Bad Santa 2. explodes with so much pent-up raunchiness

an oceanic kaleidoscope of bioluminescent color, catchy songs, and a perfectly suited vocal cast. Who knew the Rock could belt out giddy showstoppers like an old Broadway ham?

Newcomer Cravalho voices the titular heroine with a skill that belies her age - she was 14 at the time - and comes across as one of Disney's most intrepid and effervescent characters in years. The Disney "princess template" is in full effect, but it suits the narrative and this time there's no real love story to get in the way of Moana's headlong quest. That involves leaving her beloved but insular and stifling island home and setting sail in a traditional Hokulea canoe across storm-tossed seas in search of the demigod Maui (Johnson). Turns out the brawny, tattooed, and mightily egotistic Maui he could give Trump a run for his money in the megalomania department - has stolen a magical stone from the gods and is living out his days on a desert island. You'd think he'd be

perseverance in the face of the unknown and - no mean feat - how to become a true seafaring voyager just as her ancestors were. She even learns to chart her course by dead reckoning. It's exactly the kind of can-do spirit that rattled little kids (and their equally shell-shocked moms and dads) could learn from in these

spunky and smart as Moana, but their relationship is comically adversarial at first before finally turning, inevitably, to mutual respect. Along the way, Moana learns the virtues of

> angry and confusing times. Disney's animators have outdone themselves this time out. Moana

is easily one of the studio's most visually breathtaking creations, fair to bursting with shockingly vivid imagery that's just this side of magical. Indeed, the entirety of the ocean is a character in its own right, and a sequence of Moana and Maui becalmed beneath a starry night sky as a huge, glowing manta ray circles their boat is downright gorgeous.

It's rough sailing out in the real world these days, but Moana's moral message - never give up and you'll discover anything is possible if you cooperate rather than compete – feels exactly right for both kids and their parents right about now.

and wrongdoing that it can feel like the film's cup (of jizz) runneth over. The original film hit with stealth force, using the holiday's

iconography and sentiments against us in an assault on our expectations. The breakthrough screenplay by Glenn Ficarra and John Requa, and the direction by Hollywood outsider Terry Zwigoff (*Ghost World*) helped carve Billy Bob Thornton's reprobate Santa into a shamanistic tool to ward off the season's insincere excess of glad tidings. The sequel, however, substitutes the much less iconoclastic Mark Waters as the director and a screenplay by first-timer Johnny Rosenthal and *Whip It*'s Shauna Cross, for a resulting product that overdoses on raunch but leaves the wit behind.

The new film adds Kathy Bates in a Mrs. Claus costume to the larcenous team of Willie (Thornton) and Marcus (Cox), who robbed stores on Christmas Eve after casing them for weeks while playing Santa and his elf for scores of kiddies. In addition to thieving, Willie's sins include alcoholism and indiscriminate sexual intercourse with all willing orifices. Bates is cast as Willie's wretched mom, who may be even more degenerate and conniving than he. The Oscar winner appears to be having a blast as she strips off the Mrs. Claus veneer right down to her biker-chick tattoos; nevertheless, it's disconcerting to hear her constantly addressing her son as "Shitstick" along with the rest of her crude dialogue. There's more shock than humor in her lines, and the same goes for the other characters, among them the returning idiot child (and now grown man) Thurman Merman (Kelly). Bates fares better than the film's other female characters, whose only narrative function is as semen receptacles, a group that includes Christina Hendricks as the sex-starved head of the Chicago charity that is to be robbed, Jenny Zigrino as a buxom security guard that must be seduced, and Octavia Spencer as a prostitute, here reprising a cameo bit from the first movie.

It would be dishonest to say there are no laughs to be had in *Bad Santa 2*, but they're not the kind that help spit in the face of the holiday's hedonism and forced merriment. These jokes may be good for momentary release, but the joke's no longer on the holiday: It's on us.

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

BILLY LYNN'S LONG HALFTIME WALK D: Ang Lee; with Joe Alwyn, Garrett Hedlund, Arturo Castro, Steve Martin, Vin Diesel, Chris Tucker, Mackenzie Leigh, Kristen Stewart. (R, 110 min.)

A rare dud from two-time Oscar-winning director Ang Lee (*Life of Pi, Brokeback*

Mountain), Billy Lynn's Long Halftime Walk marches in formation but stirs little awe. The troops perform admirably and complete the film's overall mission, but nothing has been won, no ground is gained. Based on the 2012 novel by Ben Fountain (with a screenplay by first-timer Jean-Chrisophe Castelli), Billy Lynn takes place on Thanksgiving Day 2004, during a halftime appearance at a Dallas football game as the culmination of Bravo Squad's two-week heroes' tour of the U.S.A. The film hits all the story's marks as it depicts the discombobulating swirl of Private Billy Lynn's thoughts on the day in question. The only problem is that this Thanksgiving is no fateful day packed with pivotal moments and significant changes, or one that alters the life of the protagonist, or our understanding of him. Nor does the film deliver a sense of the unfettered patriotism or unconstrained satire that the story premise seems to warrant. Billy Lynn's Long Halftime Walk is dramatically inert.

Newcomer Joe Alwyn can't be faulted for his performance as the film's title character. His open-faced and evocative Billy Lynn is a 19-year-old Army private and inexperienced virgin from Stovall, Texas, who has become an overnight hero due to a viral photograph of him taking dead aim at the enemy while rescuing the body of his wounded lieutenant (Diesel) in Iraq. We join Billy and his squad in a Cowboys-like football arena in Dallas shortly thereafter, during a quickly arranged national tour designed to celebrate national heroes and the American armed forces. Bravo Squad is set to appear as the background artillery during a halftime performance by Destiny's Child (featuring a Beyoncé-like stand-in cagily filmed only from behind). The artifice of the staged event contrasts with Billy's flashbacks to the battlefields of Iraq. Meanwhile, the showtime fireworks and loud blasts rattle the PTSD-frayed nerves of the soldiers. A fast-talking manager (Tucker) is constantly on the horn trying to sell the squad's story to Hollywood, and the team owner (Martin, in a Jerry Jones-like turn) tries to charm the soldiers and lowball them at the same time. A pretty cheerleader (Leigh) talks of God and country while making out with the smitten Billy, while his sister (Stewart) wages an earnest campaign to talk her brother out of redeploying. These various strands roll through Billy's mind like scenes in a Mattel View-Master, but none gain much emotional momentum or dramatic weight. The absurdities never amount to a Catch-22, and the follies never add up to a




The knock on *Billy Lynn* is that too much attention was paid to the film's pioneering shooting technique, in which director Ang Lee and cinematographer John Toll wildly bumped up the frame rate so that the 3-D image has a vividness and clarity that surpass anything else on the screen today. That is, maybe it will appear that way to you if you're one of the few to see the film at either of the two solitary venues in the country where it is being projected in this manner. The rest of us will see a 2-D film that contains some sharp imagery that is ultimately blunted by the dullness of the storytelling. *Billy Lynn's Long Halftime Walk* is a hobbled parade.



THE EAGLE HUNTRESS D: Otto Bell; narrated by Daisy Ridley. (G, 97 min., subtitled)

Girl power takes flight in this upbeat documentary about a 13-year-old Kazakh girl in the remote Altai Mountains who flouts centuries of tradition to become the first female eagle hunter in her family. It's a kick to watch the guileless Aisholpan and her soaring companion break through the skyblue glass ceiling of northern Asia to claim her own birthright in this family-oriented film with a post-feminist bent. With the unconditional support of a sympathetic father who patiently trains her in the art of falconry,

Aisholpan pursues her ambition without apology, undeterred by the scorn and derision of the cultural patriarchy. (The before-andafter interviews of these naysayers, which precede and follow Aisholpan's upset victory over her older, all-male competition at the region's annual Eagle Festival, are the film's comic highlights.) For today's generation of daughters, she's an authentic movie heroine, like Katniss, Elsa, and other third-wave girls on film who defy gender expectations. No wonder grrrl du jour Daisy Ridley, the scrappy Rey in the reinvigorated Star Wars franchise, offered to narrate the film after seeing its premiere at the Sundance Film Festival earlier this year. In an industry that manufactures its idols, Aisholpan is the real thing.

But can the same be entirely said for The Eagle Huntress? The film's feel-good high is tempered by a bothersome suspicion about where the line between documenting the truth and shaping the truth is drawn. To be clear: There's no doubt about the veracity of Aisholpan's inspirational story. She exists. and she's a champion in every sense. But many sequences in the film appear planned out, even staged, lessening the thrill if you focus too much on the convenience of the narrative arc or the precision of the beautifully framed shots. If you didn't know any better, you might mistake The Eagle Huntress for a narrative feature film. (Perhaps that's the reason for the added five minutes of narration supplied by Ridley.) Ever since seminal documentarian Robert Flaherty manipulated Nanook's world back in 1922, the genre has tended to focus more on the cinema than the vérité. Maybe the conundrum is simply the nature of art, to impose a point of view on life and structure it accordingly, with the objective of extracting something meaningful in the end. Or maybe, it's just like the bumper sticker says: Reality is in the eye of the beholder. - Steve Davis ***

RULES DON'T APPLY D: Warren Beatty; with Beatty, Lily Collins, Alden Ehrenreich, Matthew Broderick, Martin Sheen, Candice Bergen, Annette Bening, Taissa Farmiga, Haley Bennett. (PG-13, 126 min.)

Howard Hughes may have grown wary of the public eye, but 40 years after the famous recluse's passing, the public eye still has him under the microscope. Martin Scorsese's 2004 biopic *The Aviator* was a close-tocompletist portrait of the entrepreneur, movie mogul, inventor, and oddball, while other films like Jonathan Demme's *Melvin and Howard* and Orson Welles' *F for Fake* have chewed more peripherally on his outsize character.

At first, writer/director Warren Beatty's passion project Rules Don't Apply seems to fall in the second camp, casting Hughes (Beatty) as a side attraction to the budding love story between two of his employees in the late Fifties. Frank Forbes (Ehrenreich) is paid to chauffeur around Hollywood Hughes' many starlets under contract, including Marla Mabrey (Collins), a devout Baptist trying to break into the industry without taking off her clothes. Frank and Marla both have big dreams – a source of their bonding – but step one to realizing those dreams is getting the unpinnable Hughes to actually meet with them face to face. Cleverly, Beatty withholds Hughes not just from Frank and Marla, but the audience, too. By the time we finally meet him, the anticipation has taken on Harry Lime-like proportions.

Oh, but what a steep drop-off follows. Beatty hasn't acted in a feature film since the 2001 misfire *Town & Country*, and here, two-plus decades too old to be playing Hughes, he has just enough charisma to keep an erratically scripted character interesting as a supporting player – a prod on the plot and not its chief purpose. But he keeps tugging the covers from his young leads, drawing the story away from their winsome romance and toward Hughes' mania and grasping to hold on to his company. He's a seeming subplot that swallows the film whole.

Was that always the intention? There's enough extratextual evidence to wonder if the movie mutated in postproduction: The credits list four editors, as well as the prominent billing of two actors (Dabney Coleman, Chace Crawford) I don't recall making the final cut of the movie. That's just speculation, of course. What's plain onscreen – and often metered out in short, choppy scenes – is an inconsistency in tone, swerving from peppy to morose, and an ambivalence in whether we're meant to read Hughes as a comical or tragic figure. Either way, Beatty has taken an object of enduring fascination and made him ... not so much.

Christian Wolff (Affleck) is a math savant-cum-assassin. Affleck hits all the character's notes: socially inept nerd, aloof and obsessive autistic adult, and precisioncoiled and affectless killer. Wolff's been told that he needs to cool his criminal trail for a while and take a standard job as a forensic accountant. While he's laying low at an electronics firm, a staff accountant (Kendrick) discovers a financial discrepancy that needs investigating - a step that launches the motivationally unclear actions of a group of killers (led by Jon Bernthal). At the same time, Wolff is being hunted by the U.S. government. There's a lot of moving parts and dangling questions, and even though they're all brought together in the end, they feel disconnected while they're occurring, leaving the movie with a disjointed feel. Wolff may not need emotional underpinnings, but the audience may want a better understanding of who he's killing and why. The movie's sum is less than some of its parts. (10/14/2016)

Everything is just a little better than it needs to be in this ambling comedy about a spirited family holiday gathering. Writer/director David E. Talbert (Baggage Claim) and the on-point cast make these family squabbles and sentiments go down with the same smooth, tasty ease of the sweet potato pie that becomes one of the film's central plot points. Patriarch Walter Meyers (Glover) is facing his first Christmas by himself after the death of his beloved wife of many decades. Alone in the big house where they raised their four children, he summons his now-grown offspring to return home for the holidays. Each comes with his or her own baggage in tow, as well as spouses, grandchildren, old resentments, and new gripes. In Denis Villeneuve's new film, a depressed linguist Louise Banks, (Adams) whose daughter has died young from an illness , and Ian Donnelly (Renner), a cosmologist with a healthy dose of brainiac optimism, must race against the worst natures of their own species and learn to converse with mysterious aliens, who have appeared in twelve stony, ovum-shaped UFOs hovering just yards over the earth at various far-flung locales, before global catastrophe. The antagonists, as per usual, are not necessarily the recent intergalactic arrivals but instead the militaries of the world. Arrival is a thoughtfully realistic depiction of how such an event might play out. Like almost all great sci-fi films it's less about the alien unknown than it is about the human condition. The script, adapted by Eric Heisserer from Ted Chiang's fine short story, is a model of nuance and restraint most of the time but it's the striking imagery and ominous sound design that really stick with you. The obsessive energy that marked Miles Teller's breakout performance as the young drummer in Whiplash is also on full display in Bleed for This, in which he plays Vinny Pazienza (aka the Pazmanian Devil), the real-life boxer from Rhode Island who won championship belts in three different weight classes. Overall, Bleed for This is a conventional boxing saga about the improbable comeback of a fallen and flawed champ. The more Vinny perseveres, the more you grow to question his single-minded purpose and devoted calling. In the end, no matter what you think of this hero and his colorful family members, the trainers and promoters, and the ceramic elephant bric-a-brac that lines the shelves of the Pazienza household, the movie brims with a restless vitality. No doubt it's this quality that attracted Raging Bull's Martin Scorsese to lend his imprimatur to the film as an executive producer. Yet, to me, Bleed for This is merely a hyperactive workout. Peter Berg's Deepwater Horizon is a hybrid/throwback to Seventies disaster films that documents the catastrophic event that led to 11 deaths on the titular oil rig, but not the lasting consequences. Wahlberg's Mike Williams is headed out for a stint on the rig, already missing his wife Felicia (Hudson) and daughter Sydney (Allen). When things go tits up, and the oil rig becomes a flaming death trap, the film's purpose comes into view. Berg is a master at depicting mayhem, people fleeing from pressurized bolts flying everywhere and flames soaring up at the worst possible time, but it ends up becoming an exhaustive puzzle as you try to figure out where everyone is in relation to everyone else. That Berg and writers Matthew Carnahan and Matthew Sand stick strictly to the day of that explosion and subsequent fire that sank the Deepwater Horizon certainly presents a narrative opportunity, but the lack of any resonance to larger issues is troubling. Cumberbatch plays Doctor Stephen Strange with exactly the right amount of cocky smugness, and while his human nemesis (Mikkelsen) feels a lot like so many other Marvel madmen, the final battle against an interdimensional being that exists beyond time itself perfectly recalls the comic's mid-to-late-Sixties hevday. Austinite C. Robert Cargill scripted alongside Scott Derrickson and Jon Spaihts, and the result is a tight, compact, and visually sumptuous origin story that revels in the surrealistic vision of Doctor Strange's legendary creator and artist Steve Ditko. Director Derrickson employs a vast array of jawdropping, vertigo-inducing set-pieces that capture that ol' Ditko magic as much as any filmed version can. Kudos to the entire visual effects team who have brought Marvel's genuinely strangest (no pun intended) hero to cinematic life. Defiantly not your everyday Avengers movie, Doctor Strange instead inhabits the same franchise universe with an outré panache. But as these things go, bigger threats reveal themselves, especially in the form of a chaotic and malevolent parasitical entity that is wreaking havoc in the city. The backdrop of New York City in the Twenties is a nice change of pace from castles and countrysides, and Redmayne's take on the absent-minded professor schtick is splendid. But when Megan goes missing the night Rachel is seen trolling her old neighborhood, drunk as a skunk (she wakes bloodied and bewildered, all memories lost to a blackout), Rachel becomes a suspect in the case. Garfield is note-perfect as the dichotomous Desmond Doss, a conscientious "cooperator" instead of objector, as he would frequently say. 

Director/ screenwriter Nichols no doubt calibrates the film so deliberately to convey how this grossly unfair law constantly weighs on the Lovings, particularly when they risk longterm imprisonment upon returning from exile to the state they call home. TYLER PERRY'S BOO! A MADEA HALLOWEEN

As a writer, director, and producer, Perry has consistently threaded compelling domestic inquires into his broad comedies; here, he explores a generational divide in parenting technique, wherein Perry's helicopter dad Brian is horrified by his own father's advice to "whoop dat ass." But Perry uses that as the setup for a painfully unfunny digression where Pa Joe muses about the time he threw Brian off the roof and landed him on life support. Har? Excepting Perry's performance as Brian - which he sells in a heartfelt third-act monologue - the film is chockablock with terrible actors, and the jokes he gives his inferior cast to work with are stinkers. Black Friday? End of an Ear!

Love Black Friday shopping, but hate bare-knuckle boxing soccer moms at Wal-Mart for the exclusive new George Strait box set? Consider dropping some coin at one of Austin's 10 record stores. Many will be stocking exclusive releases from **Record** Store Day's Black Friday edition, including a Texas-shaped 7-inch of UGK's "Int'l Players Anthem" and a single featuring live cuts from the original Alice Cooper Band's 2015 Dallas reunion.

On the local front, RSDBF pumps Bill Callahan's Apocalypse Tour LP/DVD and a Gary Clark Jr. live 10-inch. Even if special edition vinyl ain't your bag, America's busiest shopping day means good business for Austin's record retailers.

"There won't be 180 people waiting outside when we open like on [April's] Record Store Day," says End of an Ear co-owner Dan Plunkett. "But it's usually a really good day for us."

Consumer holidays aside, Plunkett's seen a 6% uptick in business since relocating into the former Action Pawn building on Ben White and Clawson one month ago. Along with die-hard regulars and visiting dignitaries including Fucked Up's Damian Abraham, Guided by Voices' Robert Pollard, and country outlaw Jerry Jeff Walker, End of an Ear's new digs are attracting virgin customers.

"There's been a weird element of people coming in off Ben White, or people who found us on their phone looking for

turntable needles who've never heard of us," detailed Plunkett during a busy Sunday afternoon at the shop. "That's odd because we're just five minutes away from where we've always been."

The recent sale of the building on South First where Plunkett and partner Blake **Carlisle** opened the shop in 2005 meant the end of an era for End of an Ear, but it also prompted a game-changing transaction. Plunkett and Carlisle found a perfect location two miles south and financed a loan for its purchase – a bold move in a town where few. if any, record stores own their own property.

"It's kind of like buying a house: Your mortgage payment ends up being less than what you'd be paying in rent," explains Plunkett. "Sure there's headaches like having to fix your own toilets, but now we don't have to worry about rent going up or it being sold. It's a relief."

It's also a sign of stabilization in an industry that's endured years of decline. Long gone are the days of knowing you could sell 500 copies of a major artist's record, but indie stores - equipped with staff knowledgeable

in niches - now have a handle on customer interest. Plunkett savs CD sales have steadied at 15% of overall revenue, while vinyl now represents 60-70% of their business - the majority of that being new records.

Then there's stereo equipment, audio gear, and cassettes.

"Who knew cassettes would come back?" shrugs Plunkett, who co-owned another record store, 33 Degrees near UT, when that format was dying out. "We've all had to keep on our toes."

End of an Ear now employs 11 people, a big operation compared to the early days when it was just he and Carlisle unpacking boxes. Plunkett says the first seven years in business were "panic mode," but now they're comfortable and, with a new building, enjoying the prospect of longevity. Since they've "bought the house," "Playback" asked how he'd humanize the store's life cycle.

"I think we're in our energetic 30s, maybe having a kid soon, but we're still having fun with it "

Grizzly Hall Changes Hands

Grizzly Hall, the East Riverside venue that looks like a heavy metal hunting lodge, has changed hands. The 500-plus capacity room, which in recent years has housed Beauty Ballroom, Antone's, and Midway Field House, will now be operated by longtime Dirty Dog Bar GM Ben Davis and booker Anthony Stevenson, whose Come and Take It Productions has slotted metal into the Sixth Street mainstay as well the annual Texas Independence and Texas Revolution fests.

Stevenson confirmed he and Davis have taken over the lease at 2015 E. Riverside from Jason Sabala, a former Emo's partner who opened Grizzly Hall last May. They'll take over operations immediately and plan to revamp and rebrand the club in coming months. There's roughly five years remaining on the current lease.

Texas thrash legends D.R.I. christen the new operation next Thursday. Stevenson says the venue will serve Austin's metal community, but will feature a variety of genres. Other shows already on the books include deathcore warriors Born of Osiris and classic metallurgists Anvil. Stevenson says smaller shows can be accommodated by cordoning off the venue's upper level and that they plan to have the venue open during happy hours so it can double as a neighborhood bar.

HOLA CARAVANA!

Jason McNeely says there's potential for a cultural corridor between Mexico City and Austin, wherein underground bands can cross the border and thrive in each other's scenes. The **Barracuda**/ Hotel Vegas co-owner begins exploring those possibilities this weekend with Caravana!

The two-day event at Barracuda imports a trio of Mexico City acts: the garage-rock en Español of Jóvenes Adultos, English-language psych fuzz group Cascabel, and Risin' Sun, a Wayne Kramerapproved power trio of poofy-haired classic rockers. They'll join a cadre of Austin representatives including Holy Wave, Troller, and Rotten Mangos on Saturday. The night before, Ringo Deathstarr, Daniel Francis Doyle, Ramesh, and others lay out a welcome mat at the Seventh Street club.

Next month, McNeely leads three of Austin's top rockers -American Sharks, Holy Wave, and Spray Paint (whose guitarist Cory Plump will soon move south of the border) - to Mexico City for concerts co-promoted with their local scene-makers Indie Rocks! and Festival Nrmal.

"Mexico's music scene is incredibly vibrant and we want to be a part of it," enthuses McNeely. "It's not just psych and garage, it's all genres - hip-hop, rockabilly, country & western. I want to create a consistent exchange of performers between there and Austin."

HALF NOTES

Organizers promise a return in 2018, writing, "With more time we can present the best festival without compromises." Last month, "Playback" reported that Levitation owners were in talks with ACL Fest producers C3 Presents - the local Live Nation affiliate - to co-produce the event. Tim Sweetwood, C3's talent buyer who's been point man on the partnership, declined comment, but the deal appears to still be in the works. After this year's festival cancellation due to weather, Levitation organizers were left in a legal entanglement with Stratus Properties, owners of former co-producers Transmission Events.

BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN APPEARS at

BookPeople next Thursday promoting his bestselling autobiography Born to Run, not to be confused with a 1996 Bruce-ography of the same title written by sometimes Chronicle contributor emeritus Dave Marsh. The tell-all, focusing on music first, life second, delves deep into the Boss' recurring depression issues. Tickets for the event, offering a pre-signed book and a photo with the king of New Jersey, sold out instantly on Tuesday. It's Springsteen's first trip to Austin since playing at the 2012 Austin Music Awards alongside Joe Ely and Aleiandro Escovedo.

STRANGER THINGS VOL. 1 held the top spot on Billboard's Vinyl Chart for the second straight week. The two-LP set features 36 tracks of eerie synth explorations from the Netflix hit by Kyle Dixon and Michael Stein, members of Austin analog tribe Survive.

BLACK PISTOL FIRE played an unadvertised show at a women's clothing boutique on Saturday afternoon - their first hometown gig since packing Emo's in May. Taking a break from their relentless conquering of North American stages, rock & roll live wires Eric Owen and Kevin McKeown set up on the floor and got rowdy, bashing out favorites then testing out some patient, soulful material from a forthcoming fifth LP.

RESIDUAL KID RELEASED a two-song EP recorded at the headquarters of Volcom, appropriate for a band rarely sighted without skateboards. The bundle, released by Warner Bros. imprint Sire, features huge live takes of unreleased tracks "Light Speed" and "Tidal Wave," which showcase the teen band's sludgy, yet melodic magic.

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
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

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Paul Cauthen strolls into the backstage area at Stubb's with a broad stride and an even wider grin. Solid of stature, the singer boasts an intimidating presence offset by boyish exuberance. He comes off as a consummate Texan, projecting a roguish independence full of hardearned pride and grateful humility.

All those elements coalesce full force on Cauthen's solo debut, last month's My *Gospel*, one of the best country albums of the year. Unlike his previous local act Sons of Fathers, the new four-star effort (see "Texas Platters," Oct. 21) unleashes the Tyler native's booming, versatile baritone in songs both searching and swaggering.

On Red River, Cauthen falls heavily into a chair outside of the green room and waits to open for Elle King at the start of a monthlong tour together. He sparks a pipe and exhales, brief reprieve from a whirlwind week that includes playing with Kris Kristofferson and flying to Cleveland for a Rock & Roll Hall of Fame tribute to Johnny Cash at the request of John Carter Cash.

"I was beside-myself excited," affirms Cauthen, his thick Texas drawl punctuated with a hearty laugh. "It's a full-circle thing. You grow up listening to those guys and now you're in a position to try and fill those shoes. It's a big ol' mindfuck!"

The threads of those classic outlaw country influences weave throughout *My Gospel*, but Cauthen also injects a soulful Southern flair that hearkens Elvis as much as Cash and Waylon Jennings. Yet the album isn't simply a throwback homage. Cauthen's songwriting puts him on par with the rising Americana tide surging against popular country music in Nashville behind artists like Chris Stapleton, Jason Isbell, and Margo Price.

"I just wanted to be honest," he says. "I believe what's lacking in the songwriting world is honesty, people writing from their heart. It sounds cliche, but I want to feel what you feel. I want it to be almost uncomfortably personal. That's what you hear in a song by Guy Clark or Townes Van Zandt.

"Those guys set a standard that nobody lately has been upholding."

The journey to that artistic realization wasn't easy or direct. It meant Cauthen splitting with Sons of Fathers and his songwriting partner David Beck just as the Austin roots outfit began garnering national attention behind 2013 sophomore effort *Burning Days* ("The Prodigy & the Prodigal," March 29, 2013). Cauthen contends the split was mutual, but bitter nonetheless.

"When David and I started Sons of Fathers, we wanted to be like the Everly Brothers forever, but you grow apart musically," offers Cauthen. "David was writing more on the pop side [see "Texas Platters," p.64] and I was writing more on the country side. The reason Sons of Fathers worked was the tension of me and him pulling music left and right, and causing it to be right in the middle. But we grew apart and it was time to move on.

"We didn't talk for a year," he continues. "I felt like we had thrown away everything we worked for. Splitting up the whole team, management, everybody that we loved that had helped us get to that point; we let a lot of people down."

That guilt weighed heavily on Cauthen, even knowing he was making the right artistic choice. "Grand Central," the first song he wrote for My Gospel, pulls between the doubts and freedom he felt in stepping away from the band. The singer's low croon

what I did when I was young, sing how I first learned," he attests. "I'm not gonna sing how anybody's taught me, not gonna sing because it sounds cool and that's what's on the pop radio. That's when you find yourself. Don't change what got you here, and what got me here was a big, boisterous, badass voice.

The New Testament

Paul Cauthen's deep country gospel

sweeps in a penitent plea as he searches for his next move.

After Sons of Fathers' spring 2014 breakup, Cauthen set up in New Braunfels and began writing. He found himself revisiting his East Texas roots and an upbringing in the church by his minister grandfather. What emerged is rough and world-weary gospel, hopeful yet rooted as much in the soil as in the heavens.

"When I finally had a table to come to and sing on my own, I decided I was gonna do "I've gotta back it up and use it correctly or I'm cutting myself short."

Working with producer Beau Bedford, Cauthen began to snag studio time whenever he could on a nonexistent budget. He recorded at Arlyn Studios, Modern Electric Sound in Dallas, and Sargent Recorders in Los Angeles. His biggest coup occurred when Bedford secured a slot at the legendary FAME studios in Muscle Shoals.

My Gospel's best tracks swell with the soulful backing support of the studio's

standout in-house contributors. "Hanging out on the Line" burns in poignant pleas, and the title track closes in a soaring reach for redemption, but "Be There Soon" builds like a cathedral behind the organ playing of Spooner Oldham, session immortal and coauthor of golden oldies "Cry Like a Baby" and "I'm Your Puppet."

"You get into that studio, and you feel there's just another presence," marvels Cauthen. "That's what God is to me, God proven in the flesh: when something beautiful is happening in the studio and everyone's on the same bus together in harmony."

Cauthen knew he'd done good work, but in time-honored music business fashion, he struggled to find a label to release it. Having enjoyed a modicum of success with Sons of Fathers, he didn't want to put out the disc without proper support. He set a deadline of his 30th birthday this spring to strike a deal or put his music on the back burner while he focused on building a life with his new fiancée.

"I was done, just over it," he admits. "I was scraping by and me and my lady were getting serious, so it was time to either start making a living or get out of the old dreamboat. I ended up getting a call from Lightning Rod [Records] on my birthday."

The Nashville imprint – which boasts releases from Austinites James McMurtry and Joe Pug, Texan great Billy Joe Shaver, and one of the hottest hands in the land, Jason Isbell – recognized an authenticity in the LP that transcended the head-turning vocals, and put its weight behind Cauthen.

"One thing I love about Chris Stapleton was that he'd been writing all these cookiecutter hits for Nashville, but when he went to the truth for himself after his father passed, he broke away everything and just said, 'What would me and my dad like to listen to?' Sturgill Simpson, same fucking thing. Once you cut everything out, you go back to what you're actually good at and nailing that 100 percent. That's when you come out with these breakout records.

"T'm not saying that mine is a breakout record," pauses Cauthen, "but these things happen because they tap into their inner soul and self. I love Stapleton's album, I love Sturgill's *Metamodern Sounds*. They're amazing, honest records. They're tapped in."

Stepping onstage later that night at Stubb's, it's clear that few of the fans packed into the amphitheatre outside to see Elle King have heard Cauthen before. As he launches into "Still Drivin'," the chugging rhythms from the quintet and Cauthen's freight-train vocals immediately capture the audience's attention. By the time he closes 40 minutes later with "My Gospel," converts make themselves heard loud and clear.

"T'm not here to cookie-cut it or do any smoke and mirrors," says the singer, taking a drag from an American Spirit cigarette. "T'm not here to impress anybody, not here to target market. I'm here to welcome and spread my gospel. It's the true raw honesty of the situation.

"I'm not here for any of the bullshit anymore, just spreading this music."

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
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BROADCASTS VOL. 24 (93.3 KGSR Radio Austin)

Digital diaspora driving consensus into extinction alongside most major record labels, KGSR's once branding "sound of our town" slogan becomes harder and harder to define as the new millennium rockets by. Younger but ancient of soul, folk-based yet beat driven, keening and intimate concurrently, the station's sound of 2016 splays seeds of tomorrow over 33 tracks on two discs clocking more than your average 120 minutes. Andra Day's stilling opener, just voice and piano - most of this nü pop strips down to the bare necessities, which somehow lends Broadcasts Vol. 24 a pleasing non-secularity – would catch even



Adele's breath. At ACL Fest last month, that same Cassandra Batie of San Diego evoked Billie, Ella, Nina, but here she's pure "Set Fire to the Rain." Feminine wiles abound (Samantha Gongol of Philly duo Marian Hill, London's Ellie Rowsell in Wolf Alice), but the boys retain a majority as led by City & Colour's Dallas Green demonstrating his own high golden cry as accompanied by guitar and now a Canadian Jeff Buckley signpost on "Lover Come Back." A Southern Dylan-esque lilting Charlie Mars' "Benji" is bested only by the Avett Brothers' still pitch perfect reupholstering of Appalachia. Strumbellas fail at the same, but who needs a Civil Wars when there's the Oh Hellos? Mañana's Guy Clark brigade (Jason Isbell, Robert Ellis, Austin's Hayes Carll) rides shotgun, though it's legitimate vox populi ringing the biggest bells: a violin-aping Wes Miles of Ra Ra Riot vs. the emphatic, slightly unhinged percussive vocal clang of UK sensation Jack Garratt. Shakey Graves' distorted busker walk-off bookends the collection as throaty as Andra Day, and while there's plenty of "who?" moments (Lukas Graham, Vance Joy, Matt Simons, George Ezra), discoveries rack up Declan McKenna, a 17-year-old Brit with a spot of Declan McManus. In other corners, international indie (Frightened Rabbit) meets domestic DIY (Jr. Jr.), and the two sync beautifully. Scandinavians duke it out between the peculiar stiltedness of Norwegians, in this case 20-year-old Aurora, and the crystalline fjord folk of Børns (okay, Michigan's Garrett Borns). The decidedly un-FCC-friendly gospelese of Nathaniel Rateliff's "S.O.B." nails another vocal peak. More kinetic fuzz busters like White Denim's "Ha Ha Ha Ha (Yeah)" could've been employed, but when that closes the first disc and the second begins with former Denim anchor Josh Block banging Leon Bridges through "Smooth Sailin'," Broadcasts Vol. 24 bottles Austin's freckled urban soul. *** Raoul Hernandez

BROWNOUT Brownout Presents Brown Sabbath Vol. II (Ubiquity)

Swirling Latin funk into Black Sabbath's dark arts distortion sounds like a gimmick, but Brownout channeling the British outfit by appending its Afro-Latin psychedelia on Brownout Presents Brown Sabbath Vol. II succeeds like scant few other unholy alliances. Reworking Ozzy Osbourne and company's genre-birthing doom, Brownout's initial stab at the Sabs appeared in 2014, a cosmic cantina throwdown replete with "N.I.B." and heavy-lidded salsa meander "Planet Caravan." The ninepiece continues reworking the metal gods' Seventies catalog (Master of Reality to Sabotage) by injecting a border crack to the proceedings,



most notably the ricocheted bullet congas of "Supernaut" and "Sweet Leaf," squealing horn marches in "Electric Funeral," and crashed percussion bombardment on "Fairies Wear Boots." Offshoot of orchestral kings Grupo Fantasma, Brownout's booming horn section and fuzz riffs intertwine like sinewy limbs in "Snowblind," and thrash metal palm mutes crescendo to chaotic vacillations of congas, hi-hats, and tom-toms in "Symptom of the Universe," Frontman Alex Marrero voices an eerie replica of Ozzy on "Children of the Grave," but backing instrumental powerhouse Brownout proves Brown Sabbath Vol. II anything but a stunt. ****

BLUE HEALER

Blue Healer can't help but be the best adultcontempo band in Austin's underground. The trio, anchored by David Beck and Bryan Mammel of

aborted Americana darlings Sons of Fathers, formed in daring concept: pop music via distorted upright bass and Reagan-era kevboards. Their smoothness, led by Beck's smoky, lady-killer voice, results in soft rock, synth pop, and chill indie sounds that flow modern radio. As such, Blue Healer's debut unfolds with stormy love metaphor, "Only the Rain," a timeless slow jam readymade for a Phil Collins Grammy. Beck and the gang repeat the formula with the dually hit-worthy "Crystal Chandeliers," but the self-produced full-length proves a multifarious effort, striking a sharp soul crunch reminiscent of Dan Auerbach's Arcs on "Empty Bottles," then breaking into Floyd-ian space rock with "30,000 Ft." Monster bassist, Beck's cornball lyricism ranges from "I want to hear the crash and boom baby, play a fight song, play a fight song!" to the make-out pop come on, "only if she tastes like diamonds." Pay off the program director and get Blue Healer in rotation now.

SMILE Like a Diamond in the Rough, You Shine

Sunny dissonance, avant-garde pop, and playful instrumentation informs Smile's warm

sincerity. For an act still in its infancy, the Austin sixpiece demonstrates a remarkably clear idea of its identity on these six debut songs. Opener "All the Things" creeps into fullness, led by the airy harmonies of Annie Long and Mary Bryce, then spins off into dizzying coils of distortion, caveman drums, and mathy guitars. On "Must Be Something Pt. 1," the album's namesake lyric is sung over and over, anchoring the track while the chugging bassline and instrumentation builds onto itself an ornate, intricate soundscape. Instead of getting wound up in the profound musical technicality of the players, Smile's silliness on Like a Diamond in the Rough, You Shine lovingly bleeds into precision. When bandleader Jake Miles sweetly sings, "Misery loves its company, so baby, won't you cum for me?" on lovestruck "I Dunno," and "Proper Design" devolves into discord and giggles, you'll grin. ***

ECONOMY ISLAND (Twistworthy)

Now that the Eighties New Wave revival is winding down, time to jump back to the first half of

the next decade. Austin's Economy Island unabashedly mines the sound of the early Nineties, when college rock evolved into alternative and that term hadn't yet become a marketing gimmick and radio format. Made

up, like so many homegrown alt-rock acts, of musicians from punk backgrounds (including Bum Out, SpiderCobra, and Adults), El stamps bristling energy and DIY ethics into vinyl revolving around warm distortion, hazy vocal melodies, and guitar hooks of easy virtue. Chunky power-pop tunes à la "Keychain" and "The Mountain" dominate, taking advantage of singer Richi Fatheree's reedy winsomeness and the yin/yang of his and John Christoffel's

guitar work. The latter finds fullest flower on "Typically Weak," an extended take on alternative rock tunefulness that features plenty of six-string magic without flash or fury. ***

IMPERIALISTS Who Are You Afraid Of?

Acquiring a more straightforward tack for round two, Austin duo Imperialists follows up its debut, the stormy



alt-synth pop fusion Arrhythmia, with anthemic synth sweller Who Are You Afraid Of? Co-produced by renowned Austin producer Erik Wofford, the former Ghost of the Russian Empire members' billowing harmonies and cloudy ambience remain from the first fulllength. Radio-ready lead track "Nuke (Look Me in the Eyes)" echoes early Mutemath and the better bits of Eighties arena synth, Genesis covering experimental Tortoise jams. "What more could you want to calm your nerve," sings drummer Brandon Whitten on the driving "What More Could You Want," which dissolves into itself as a standout indie rock-out with Pete Townshend-like guitar plucking. "A Strength Unmatched" distends outward, Roland 808-like bass hits swallowed by waves of synth. "Why not give up?" asks Whitten, on "Standing Stretch," featuring a skittering beat that mushrooms into an electronic hoedown. An unyielding and optimistic effort, Who Are You Afraid Of? represents a strengthening of the Imperialists' sound, now stable, compact, and ready for travel. *** Kahron Spearman

ATTIC TED Parade Dust Mischief (Pecan Crazy)

If Attic Ted was something you could eat, it would strike pie holes with the what-the-hell



discombobulation of raw oysters and grape jelly. With a \$20 Hammond chord organ serving as sonic fulcrum, the San Marcos collective warbles and groans like a living Rube Goldberg device hopped up on ergot alkaloids as they belch forth a bouquet of Eastern European shortwave signals and corn dogscented sturm und twang. This latest multicolored vinyl missive captures Attic Ted in full flower thanks to producer/engineer Paul D. Millar's 16-track analog prowess. Lead instigator/mask-maker Grady Roper corrals Benny Hill bleats and a cowpunk beat to drive swirling opener "Next Time." A twisted take on Bob Wills' "Take Me Back to Tulsa" steers Western swing down the rabbit hole, while 1919 sheet music smash "How Ya Gonna CONTINUED ON P.70

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

Belter Joe Doerr somehow makes his relentless barrage of lyrics not sound like word yak, knowing exactly when to drop the wordplay for something simple and true. Careening from the herky-jerky "One Big White Nightmare" to the roiling "Metanoia" and flat-out rocking "Hallelujah," Churchwood gleefully tests the blues for flexibility. - Michael Toland ****

RICK BROUSSARD'S TWO HOOTS & A HOLLER Time Has Shown Me

Eighth disc in 32 years, TH&AH's Time Has Shown Me has had ample time to craft an impressive


scope and diversity. Barring "Seek Strike and Destroy" being a co-write with bassist Brad Fordham, every song's a Broussard original, their variety of country and rock & roll styles assimilating into a uniquely Texan punkabilly stew. Powerhouse drumming by Lisa Pankratz locks in with Fordham's death-grip bass, ably supporting Broussard's clear, twangy tenor and barking Telecaster. A stellar supporting cast - Casper Rawls, Tony Scalzo, and John X. Reed, among many others - help negotiate the stylistic shifts with skill and wit, Bradley Jaye Williams' accordion drenching several tracks. Highlights include Doug Sahmdamaged Tex-Mex opener "Oh, Rain," Ray Price-ian honky-tonk shuffles ("Austin Traffic." "Port A"), some Roy Orbison-esque melodrama ("Typical of You," a duet with Rosie Flores), something resembling Morrissey backed by the Shadows ("The Past Is Gone"), and snarling punk ("Black Cat Lounge"). Cris Burns produces sympathetically, and garage recordist supreme Jim Diamond (White Stripes, Dirtbombs, Fleshtones, Jon Spencer Blues Explosion) mixes and masters with clarity and distinction.

NEKRIST Seeking Justice in a Criminal Way

"I don't give a fuck about your cause or your sympathy!" roars Nekrist front-beast Teddow on "Without Scars." Opening the local metal quartet's six-song Criminal record, the track's furiously downstroked riffs match sentiment to aggression. Despite low budget production, drummer Stevie drives the beat deep into the Earth with every hit, guitarist Massie squealing angrily between choruses as Teddow chews up every inch of scenery in expanding his lungs. Feel teeth gritting and veins popping with every thrash lick, blast beat, and breakdown. The band isn't here to drag us hell-ward, however. Though Teddow convinc-



ingly insists that "You're blistered! I'm blistered! We're all blistered!" ("Blistered"), Nekrist's onslaught lassos defiance, not nihilism. "Despite these reasons I still carry on!" claims the singer on "The Cost," pulling positivity out of what might otherwise be inchoate rage. *** - Michael Toland

WILLIAM CLARK GREEN Live at Gruene Hall

William Clark Green strikes while the iron's hot. Capitalizing on the

Top 20 country charts success of last year's fourth LP Ringling Road, the rising Texas kicker doubles down with a 2-CD performance recorded at historic New Braunfels honky-tonk Gruene Hall. WCG delivers best live, the raucous crowd feeding his backing quartet, which roars a genuine guitar ruckus. "Next Big Thing" sets the stage as "Hanging Around" slides into Tom Petty's "Won't Back Down." The bandleader's hallmark humbleness comes through in both the songs and banter, as he rips through favorites "Creek Don't Rise" and "Rose Queen" even as the rough-twanged tenderness of duet "Final This Time" with Dani Flowers changes pace. Disc 2 barrels through the bigger hits, with "Tonight" and "Sympathy" leading into an emotional tribute to late Cheatham Street Warehouse owner Kent Finlay with "Still Think About You." "Wishing Well" gets a full 10-minute rock-out and nearly nine go to medley/singalong "She Likes the Beatles." Jack Ingram helps encore with an acoustic "Goodnight Moon." Green on Gruene makes gold. – Doug Freeman ***

ELIJAH FORD & THE BLOOM As You Were (Nine Mile) MARC FORD & THE NEPTUNE **BLUES CLUB** The Vulture

Getting his professional start locally with Ryan Bingham, Elijah Ford, son of onetime Black Crowes axe slinger Marc Ford, doesn't follow in his for-

mer employer's roots-soaked footsteps on his second album. California-born/Austin-based, the singer-guitarist favors pop that hearkens back to an era when the troubadour profession didn't automatically consign someone to an Americana ghetto. Co-writing with Bloom bandmates Z Lynch and Chris Konte, Ford buoys the catchy melodies of "Hollow Years" and "The Way We Were" with politely crunchy guitars, tasteful keyboards, and a voice with

the right amount of grit. Polished but not slick, As You Were kicks up dust without rattling the windows. Having already done his time in the rock & roll trenches, the elder Ford digs deeper under the tree for his sixth LP The Vulture. Wrapping his songs in a warm country-soul vibe, dad favors feel and function over flash, reserving most of his hot licks for fills rather than solos. He still boogies from time to time, particularly on songs co-written by his band, like the choogling "Arkansas Gas Card" and snarling "Shalimar Dreams." Yet he sounds best on the ballads "Deep Water" and the title track, moving his heart from his sleeve to your ear. Utterly without pretension, The Vulture earns, rather than demands, your close attention. (Both) ★★★

ETHAN **AZARIAN** & JEFF JOHNSTON When You Were Young



Vermonter Azarian and Dallasite Johnston's richly textured strain of songwriting first emerged when the two performed together in the Orange Mothers. Since then, the Austin duo have whittled ever closer to the essence of emotions that words usually fail to capture. Whether transmuting a sense of well-being or of queasy foreboding, the primary characteristic of these songs remains overwhelming humanness. The opening title track takes well-trod Nashville sentiment and imbues it with new life via a heart-rending arrangement and lyrics that celebrate "the freedom of knowing nothing." In harrowing contrast, "Teach Your Children Well" defies its titular CSN pedigree with a pedal steel and theremin-soaked dirge. "The Ballad of Sally Anne" borrows its title from a traditional bluegrass song while transposing the tragedy from a lynching to a young woman dying in a car crash. Azarian's intimate scope brings in details like the surviving friends trying to figure out who's going to call her parents. No summer blockbusters here, just life rendered at sidewalk scale. ****



Red Fang

MOHAWK, FRIDAY 25 Florida/Georgia stoner-pop quartet Torche and Atlanta noise rock threesome Whores open

Boasting big guitar hooks, rhythmic pummel, and a dual growled/sung vocal attack, Red Fang has cut an impressive swath across the indie metal landscape over the course of its decadelong existence. Only Ghosts, the Portland, Ore., quartet's third Relapse Records release and fourth full-length overall, finds its dissonance-spiked stoner rock reaching its most potent rush yet.

"I don't care if anyone loves this," insists guitarist Bryan Giles by phone from San Francisco on the first night of the band's trifecta tour with melodic sludge streamliners Torche and an up-and-coming trio of Atlanta noise, Whores. "If this gets panned universally. I don't care. Because we're proud of it, and it's representative."

The album follows up 2013's Whales & Leeches, whose single "Blood Like Cream" earned Red Fang a rare honor for an underground metal act: a spot on Late Show With David Letterman.

"I thought it was a joke, actually," laughs Giles. "We got an email saying, 'When are you available for David Letterman?' And I said. 'Hah! That's hilarious!' 'No. for real. when are you available?' A month and a half later we were in there doing it.

'We loaded in at 4am or something, did a rehearsal, left for an hour and a half, went back for dress rehearsal, then left for anoth-

er hour and a half, and finally performed. It was scary, going in cold and playing one song for however many million people - many of whom have never heard of us before.

"So it was really intense, and I gotta say I was terrified, so it was sort of unpleasant. But it was also really exciting. I'd do it again. It's like a really big adult roller coaster, and it lasts about the - Michael Toland same amount of time."






