THAT'S HOW DOORS WORK

Dear Editor,

Your article "Point Austin: Slamming the Golden Door" [News, Jan. 27] reported "As Doggett points out, Austin and Travis County are not even 'sanctuary cities' ...," yet in direct opposition to this claim, on p.10 under "Civics 101," an "Austin Sanctuary Network Benefit" was featured. Also, the "Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed, to me" quote on p.10 in your News lead article disregards the fact that right alongside the Statue of Liberty which depicts that reference on its pedestal sits Ellis Island, which very explicitly served as a "door" which could be slammed shut on immigrants for any number of reasons - disease, ethnic/ nationality group exclusions, rejection of political extremists, or any other restrictions enacted by the U.S. Congress. The concept of "immigration" found in the U.S. Constitution implies a process to become a naturalized citizen, not a green light for anyone to open the "door" to our country whenever, however, and for whomever they feel warrants admission. Would this be appropriate for entry into your own home? Victims of home invasions are due protection under the law, not recrimination from

LAND USE DEVELOPMENTS city Council received its initial CodeNEXT briefing Tuesday morning, followed by a public rollout Wednesday afternoon at the Palmer Events Center. And FY 2018 budget development began Wednesday morning. See "Rush to Judgment," p.14.

SAVE THE CHILDREN Gov. **Greg Abbott** declared **Child Protective Services** a primary emergency item for funding this legislative session during his Tuesday State of the State address. The program spent much of 2016 split between failures and controversy.

UNDER FURTHER REVIEW Donald Trump announced his nominee to fill the Supreme Court seat Republicans stole from President Barack Obama. U.S. Appeals Court Justice for the 10th Circuit Neil Gorsuch was named on Tuesday night.

UP IN FLAMES A fire destroyed the **Islamic Center of Victoria** on Saturday morning just hours after President Trump issued a Muslim travel ban. No injuries were reported. While a cause has yet to be determined, an investigation is underway. The Center has received more than \$1 million in donations to rebuild the mosque.

BISHOPS AGAINST BIGOTRY Diocese of Austin Bishop **Joe S. Vásquez** condemned Trump's executive order halting **refugee travel** to the U.S., calling aiding refugee resettlement "living out the Christian faith." Vásquez said, "It is important for us to assist all who are vulnerable and fleeing persecution, regardless of their religious belief."

BATTLING BATHROOM BILLS To fight back the anti-LGBTQ SB 6 "bathroom bill" this session the Human Pichts Commission will open

Driving the "Austin Bargain"

MAYOR ADLER'S DREAM OF A COMPROMISE ON HOUSING SUPPLY

Wednesday morning, I received a solicitation from those earnest progs at Credo (my mobile phone company), urging me to peti-

tion Mayor Steve Adler to "take a public stand against Donald Trump's xenophobic agenda, and do everything in [his] power to ... protect immigrants and refugees." The Credo folks are obviously petitioning a lot of mayors, and no doubt didn't attend Adler's State of the City speech last week, so they missed his full-throated support of Sheriff Sally

Hernandez's policy of tempered cooperation with immigration authorities, and his impromptu welcoming of immigrants and refugees in the wake of the Trump regime's arbitrary ban against Muslims. Adler and the City Council have also supported other measures to defend refugees – although the ultimate outcome of those efforts here and elsewhere, in light of federal and state opposition, remains very much in doubt.

In retrospect, that may have been the easiest part of Adler's speech. While Austin is not unanimous in its defense of immigrants, there's a considerable consensus (reflected not only from the mayor's approving City Hall audience, but among most city and county officials) that border walls and Muslim bans are not the way to go. But on an entirely

different, local subject – residential land use – Austinites remain divided as ever. I suspect if you questioned that same audience of local movers and shakers, you'd get at least a couple dozen opinions on how best to address Austin's practical and political logiam over the Land Use Code, about to endure a yearlong public battle royal under the CodeNEXT banner.

Undaunted, and despite a lingering, audibly heavy cold, the mayor was characteristically and sunnily optimistic about the possibilities of moving forward on land use and housing affordability. He urged his audience to approach the Code "on the same team," and to commit simultaneously to "protect our neighborhoods" while enabling "the increased housing supply we need to make Austin more affordable." Adler deemed his proposed compromise the "Austin Bargain": "an agreement that protects all of us from our worst fears so the community as a whole can achieve the best possible outcome."


THE FIGHT GOES ON

Who can oppose a bargain? Years ago, a small record company – Amazing Records – adopted the sardonic slogan, "If It's a Hit,

It's Amazing!" and we can only hope that Adler's "Austin Bargain" doesn't slowly become quite the same joke. As the mayor summarized it, on one side we'll all agree "not to force density in the middle of neighborhoods," and on the other, we'll allow "the housing supply we need ... along our major corridors ... and our major activity centers like the area around the Domain, Mueller, and Downtown."

That's been the mayor's consistent pitch since his 2014 campaign - that we can add all the housing supply we need on the mixed margins of "neighborhoods" (a term designating by default only street-afterstreet of detached, single-family housing, obliquely excluding any other form of multifamily domiciles). Late last year, the mayor insisted to me that not only was that additional supply achievable - his speech called for "at least 135,000 new housing units over the next decade" - but that in meetings with opposing stakeholders (he mentioned the Austin Neighborhoods Council and the Real Estate Council), he believed a similar inclination is in the air, and that cooler heads will eventually prevail. Saturday night, he reiterated, "There's no rule that says we have to keep having the same planning and zoning fights over and over again" (then joked that in fact there might be such a rule buried somewhere in the current Code).

APPROVED WITH CONDITIONS

One can only hope he's right. The consultants who presented the first draft of CodeNEXT to Council at Tuesday's work session sounded similar notes, welcoming "constructive criticism," but hoping the coming public discussion wouldn't devolve into nitpicking dismissal. Yet the draft remains big and complex, it's undeniably difficult to comprehend as a whole, and council members immediately began quibbling over one detail or another: The bugaboo of "conditional overlays" for every disputed parcel seems unlikely to disappear.

This column is written in advance of Wednesday's public rollout, where we'll begin to learn whether the various interest groups – homeowners, renters, developers, builders, urbanists, officials, etc. – can in fact learn to play well together in the city's various sandboxes. The mayor warned against "false narratives" that look for blame instead of solutions, and hoped that the CodeNEXT draft would be treated as one – subject to consensus-based revisions – rather than an immediate battlefield among competing conceptions of the ideal cityscape.

"Or will we listen to those voices that try to avoid consensus," Adler asked, "by talking up and even creating conflicts?" Those folks, on all sides, are already getting warmed up, brandishing their Twitter feeds, and making the national immigration debate look like a walk in an Austin park, next to our suspicions of and antagonisms to those newcomers who just moved in down the block. Best of luck to Mayor Adler and his would-be bargain.

What Is the Sound of One Shoe Falling?

CITY RELEASES CodeNEXT DRAFT TO MILD REACTION ... SO FAR

On the one hand, the world is going to hell, our civil liberties are down the drain, and our state and national governments and public institutions are being **"disrupted"** – intentionally, no less, by people who just hate effective democratic government. But I don't want to write, or think, about that.

On the other hand, the long-awaited first draft of Austin's brand-new **Land Develop-ment Code**, known as **CodeNEXT**, was released this week, has drawn largely positive reviews, and is decidedly, and deliberately, *not* disruptive.

To the great relief of neighborhood and environmental activists – and much early online wailing and gnashing of teeth from the city's density hawks – the planners and consultants drafting CodeNEXT did exactly what

they and **Imagine Austin** said they were going to do: rewrite the current, muchmaligned code into a simpler form that's easier to read, use, and plan for, but *not* change any existing policies or protections/limitations to any great degree. In place of traditional zoning – single-family, multifamily, retail, etc. – the code lays out a range of "**Transect Zones**" from T3

(neighborhood edge) to T6 (Downtown highrise), with the most interesting area in the middle – from small-lot residential through "Main Street" low-rise retail, to mid-rise mixed use. There's less reliance in the new code on property uses, and more on the form of the building(s): height, setbacks, impervious cover limits, etc. Thus, planners hope to encourage a mix of housing types across especially the T4 zones – emulating parts of some current neighborhoods, planners pointed out. But there's no attempt yet to define where in the city those zones would be applied. That **mapping** will be rolled out in April, and to a large extent, it's hard really to tell much until then. Still, all of the presenters at the Tuesday rollouts to City Council and to the joint Planning and Zoning & Platting commissions were at pains to emphasize that CodeNEXT, in and of itself, is not intended to do any upzoning.

John Miki of Opticos Design said it perhaps most directly, in response to a question from CM Ora Houston about increasing equity across the city: "Things have changed in the city of Austin. Now we're not in the position anymore where we're thinking about 'How do we incentivize development in East Austin?' Now maybe it's time to think about policy questions that say 'How do we think about

providing some of these protections to East Austin?' But I will caution ... that CodeNEXT at this point is providing the tools to implement existing policies. If it is a policy direction to change past decisions in East Austin, we think we are providing the tools to be able to do that, but it is a policy and a planning process that likely either has to run concurrent with CodeNEXT or

it needs to be something that happens after CodeNEXT, because again we are working right now to implement existing policies."

That policy and planning process will indeed be engaged, by both those who want to see more neighborhood protections, and those who want to see less restrictions on new construction. Official public outreach sessions are tentatively set to begin Feb. 18. Meanwhile, see the draft code, and leave comments, at www.codenext.civicomment.org. The **Food+City Challenge Prize** competition, an annual event for early stage start-ups and innovators in the global food supply system, takes place this Saturday, Feb. 4, from 11am-4pm at UT's McCombs School of Business. It's free and open to the public. Nine different countries are represented among the 18 finalist teams; attend to offer feedback, and root for East Austin's **Joe's Organics**, which picks up food waste from green businesses, composts it, and grows specialty produce for chefs and farmers' markets. More info at www.foodandcity.org.

Abbott Cuts County Funding

Gov. Greg Abbott's attack on Travis County Sheriff Saily Hernandez's noncompliance with U.S. Immigrations & Customs Enforcement continues. On Wednesday, the governor made good on his promise to cut off a stream of grant funding that'll drain \$1.5 million from the county. Abbott's Criminal Justice Division grant is typically worth \$1.8 million (the amount Abbott will bar in future years should his grandstanding continue), but \$300,000 has already been paid out for the year. Funds received through the grant help the county with its substance abuse diversion programs and family violence courts. County Judge Sarah Eckhardt confirmed the cuts during a Wednesday press conference, calling Abbott's decision "foolhardy." The judge reiterated that the affected programs are not related to the sheriff or ICE, but instead serve as Abbott's way of serving "retribution." despite the fact that Hernandez's ICE policy is "well within current law." Alan Miller. the county's assistant budget director, said the Commissioners Court will need to make an immediate decision on whether these programs will continue, but noted that there does exist a short-term safety net in county finances.

DNA Case Review Is On

Travis County Commissioners have authorized the payment of nearly \$1 million to begin reviewing cases potentially affected by the Austin Police Department's DNA Lab disaster. To begin the "materiality review," the county is expected to enter into contract with the Capital Area Private Defender Service, a local nonprofit defense agency, this month. A yearlong contract should cost \$545,407; Travis County will pay a prorated sum until the beginning of the next fiscal year, Oct. 1. "It's a triage process to determine which cases might be affected," said Roger Jeffries, county executive for Justice Planning. "We still have to negotiate a contract with CAPDS and come up with a cost sharing arrangement" with the city. County Judge Sarah Eckhardt said Tuesday that Austin isn't expected to discuss the partnership until March. A review could take five years, but the contract with CAPDS will be up for review at the end of 2018's fiscal year. - S M

Governorment Spending

Time for Gov. Greg Abbott to put the state's money where his mouth is. In his Jan. 31 State of the State address, Abbott threw red meat to conservatives, including a hiring freeze for all state agencies. That afternoon, he released his draft budget, which put cash into those agenda points, like \$35 million for the Alternatives to Abortion program. Some points may find bipartisan backing, such as a push for an extra \$500 million and an exemption on the hiring freeze for the under-resourced Child Protective Services. However, in a sign of Abbott's priorities, the total combined budget for the Department of Family and Protective Services and women's health services expects to be less than his proposed border security spending, Moreover, Abbott doubled down on the philosophy of increased tax breaks by proposing another \$250 million reduction in the franchise tax, while calling on lawmakers to hand out \$108 million in business incentives via the highly controversial Texas **Enterprise Fund**. - Richard Whittaker

Oh Lord, Won't You Buy Me ...

Car2Go won't just have its standard blue and white smart cars on Austin streets. This week, the mobile carsharing firm added 50 four-door Mercedes-Benzes (25 CLA coupes and 25 GLA SUVs) to its local fleet. The new whips cost a little more than the smart cars – 47 cents a minute or \$19 an hour, compared to 41 cents or \$15 an hour - but General Manager James Emery said, "These cars can take more people more places with more things." The new vehicles also include updated tech, making checking a car in and out much faster. Car2Go first deployed the larger vehicles in Canada in 2015, and has moved them into Austin in response to demand from existing customers, especially those with growing families. Communications Director Mike Silverman said, "People's life circumstances change, and as they grow up, we're growing up." - R W

New Dem Caucus Leader

Texas progressives looking for a little more mettle in state-level Democrats may breathe a sigh of relief with the election of Rep. Chris Turner, D-Grand Prairie, as House Democratic Caucus Leader. Turner has a solid reputation as a political strategist, and came to statewide recognition in 2014 when he ran Sen. Wendy Davis' gubernatorial campaign. While Davis failed, Turner was actually her third campaign manager - and the final period of her campaign has been heralded as having its most direction and vigor. Texas Democratic Party Chair Gilberto Hinojosa called Turner "smart, tactical, and a hard-working fighter for all." The delegation also voted in Austin Rep. Celia Israel as second vice chair, alongside Eagle Pass Rep. Poncho Nevárez as first vice chair. - R.W.

Farewell, Sue Edwards



Elaine Hart has announced the resignation of Assistant City Manager **Sue Edwards**, who has worked in various positions at the City of Austin since the early Seventies. Edwards had contemplated retirement nearly a decade ago, when former City Manager **Toby Futrell** stepped down, but

Futrell's successor Marc Ott persuaded her to stay. In an earlier transition (1994), Edwards returned from a private consulting firm to assume management of Emergency Medical Services. She told the Statesman that what she intended as a two-year sojourn "turned into 23." Hart's memo cited various projects managed by Edwards, including creation of what became the Economic Development Department, overseeing the construction of City Hall, and the city's involvement in developing the Second Street District. More recently, Hart wrote, Edwards "negotiated and oversaw redevelopment of the Robert Mueller Municipal Airport, Seaholm Power Plant, Downtown Block 21, the former Green Water Treatment Plant ... and [the city's involvement in] the formation of the Waller Creek Conservancy." Edwards' retirement will take effect March 1; Hart intends to appoint an interim assistant city manager before that date. - Michael King





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STATE OF THE CITY: MAINTAINING ITS RELATIVE SANITY

It's been another busy week in **City Council-**Land, although much of the action has been off the dais. Saturday evening featured Mayor **Steve Adler**'s third annual "**State of the City**" oration, focused primarily on welcoming but managing growth (not exactly a new Austin subject), although overshadowed and redirected a bit by breaking national news. (See "Austin: 'Strong, Unique, Special," online for a debriefing on that speech.)

That news, of course, was the Trump regime's executive order on Muslim immigration, and by Sunday at least a couple of council members were directly drawn into the national whirlwind of opposition, as Council Members Delia Garza and Greg Casar joined the public protest at Bergstrom Airport. Casar was widely quoted assuring the demonstrators that the city would support the legal defense of refugees and immigrants caught up in the chaos following the ban. That was not a new promise: In December, Council had directed staff to find "emergency funding" sufficient to help an additional 100 immigrants needing legal services - staff is expected to submit a proposal to Council by mid-February.

As if that weren't enough on the macroagenda, the local to-do list marches on. Monday morning marked the formal release of "Draft 1" of the new **Land Use Code** known as **CodeNEXT** (see below), complete with a Council press conference, and Wednesday evening featured the big public rollout at the Palmer Events Center (4-6pm, followed by the meeting of the CodeNEXT Code Advisory Group). Council received its own staff-cum-consultant briefing at Tuesday's work session, and everyone began to dip their toes into the new version – hesitation and bewilderment were the inevitable first reactions. (The work session also featured an initial presentation on the staff search for a consultant group to conduct the search for a new city manager. Very searching.) Moreover, in a fit of proaction, Council met Wednesday morning for its first, very early budget work session, on **Emergency Medical Services**.

In his SOTC speech, the mayor warned against folks who will "try to avoid consensus by talking up and even creating conflicts" over the new code. In fact, that's already happened, via the earlier leak of a working draft: competing denunciations of the draft ("Giveaway to developers!" "Complexity problem worse!") immediately floated through cyberspace. We can cheerfully look forward to at least a year of such pleasantries, with a hopeful adoption date of the new code in early 2018.

Meanwhile, last week's meeting (ending mercifully just before 10pm), did accomplish some other business, including:

Approved a pilot program for extended hours in five Red River music clubs, over strenuous objections from neighboring hotels as well as near-north neighborhoods still vibrating with music bouncing up Waller Creek; also approved a related resolution supporting music and creative industries;
Approved a resolution supporting abortion rights, opposed by CM Ellen Troxclair, with an abstention by CM Ora Houston, who considered it too aggressively "in people's faces";

• Postponed to today's meeting a final decision on maintaining an **Austin Resource Recovery** contract for curbside recycling of textiles (and other resalable items) after hard lobbying by nonprofits that it will undermine their donations (see "Council Takes Out the Trash?" online);



Approved a resolution supporting the "Austin Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights," accepted the Parkland Events Task Force Report, and a program to encourage outdoor recreation;
Directed staff to study the current supply of market-priced affordable housing and track its demolition, with an eye to programs that would serve to maintain that housing.

ON THE AGENDA

Today's agenda – at 59 Items (including a couple of those postponements) – is not so daunting as last week's, but will still offer plenty to do. Items that might trigger dais pondering include:

A proposed ordinance (Item 4) to finalize increased and clarified authority for the City Auditor and the Ethics Commission (including commission subpoena power);
A resolution (Item 40) to draft an ordinance to require new construction (residential and commercial) to be "solar-ready";

• A resolution (Item 42) to draft amendments to the Land Development Code enabling "expedited permitting" (codifying the "Better Builder Program" establishing workers' right standards approved last year);
Postponed from last week, a resolution (Item 43) that would expand library-based "video-conferencing" to allow Citizen Communications during Council meetings from other locations (CMs apparently want more geographic distribution of denunciations of Agenda 21, chemtrails, etc. ...).

The Austin Oaks PUD, notionally approved on first reading in December, is also on the listed agenda to return today. But during Tuesday's work session, D10 CM Alison Alter proposed a two-week postponement to which nobody (including the developer) apparently objects, so that should save considerable jaw-jaw time today. The proclamations will honor **Teen** Dating Violence Awareness Month, and Dan's Hamburger's (only?) 40th anniversary. Live music honoree is the legendary Augustin Ramirez. Expect him to lay down "La Ley de Tejas." – Michael King

RUSH TO JUDGMENT: CODENEXT 1.0 OUT NOW

CodeNEXT has at last kerplunked onto the city scene, and everyone's first order of business now becomes figuring out how to feel about the darned thing. By Wednesday, only the most ardent land development code geeks had made any substantial plunge into the massive document's 1,100or-so pages. And yet, there has been no shortage of opinions. Representing the most mild of observants, city spokesperson **Alina Carnahan** said, "A lot of people are really relieved and excited to finally be able to comment on the draft."

"Relieved" and "excited" were also terms used by **Jim Duncan**, chairman of the **Code Advisory Group** that Council created in 2013 to act as a conduit for public opinion during the CodeNEXT process. Duncan, the city's director of planning during the last land code rewrite in 1984, offered gentle criticisms of the draft's length and lingering complexity, knowing the entire point of CodeNEXT was to streamline the existing code while at the same time fulfilling visions presented through **Imagine Austin** (including the oftrepeated idea of creating a "compact and connected city"). "I don't think in this draft [that] staff have taken great liberty in making changes," Duncan observed. He added that he expects the public vetting process to pare down the initial bulk before the new code makes its way to Council in 2018.

In the meantime, several voices who will no doubt make themselves heard during the upcoming public vetting process have begun airing their first impressions of the public draft. Former **Austin Neighborhoods Council** President **Mary Ingle** told the Austin Monitor on Tuesday that she feels the draft allows commercial uses to creep into some single-family areas, a red line for the ANC and its allies, a coalition that features

other groups such as the **Save Our Springs** Alliance and **People Organized in Defense** of Earth and Her Resources. Lauren Ice,

a member of the CAG and an attorney with the SOS Alliance, told the *Chronicle* Wednesday that the coalition is still reviewing the draft but has so far seen "several things that are really encouraging, but several other things that give us some concern."

Less optimistic are groups under the **Evolve Austin** umbrella, which has organized to push for significant reforms under CodeNEXT. **AURA** board member **Steven Yarak** called the document a "behemoth" and decried its complexity. "Moreover, with almost all of the old code in there as well, it would appear we've spent four years and \$4 million in consulting fees to keep doing what we've been doing the past 30 years," he said, "making Austin less affordable, less inclusive, and less weird."

Others panned the draft for preserving existing neighborhood plans, neighborhood conservation combining districts, and other ordinances that regulate development rules. Carnahan explained that staff has no power to overturn the outcomes of hard-fought battles that produced measures such as the SOS Ordinance: "We're not wiping the slate clean and saying, 'We know Council passed these ordinances but we're deleting those.' We're keeping those."

Despite that, Carnahan allowed that staff plans to funnel to the **Planning Commission** and ultimately to Council all significant concerns aired during the upcoming public feedback process. For the next several months, staff will blitz the city with public forums, open houses, and social media campaigns to gather comments that will shape the rewrite of the draft rewrite. That effort has officially kicked off, which means if you haven't already started, it's past time to delve into the public draft. – *Caleb Pritchard*

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Adding fuel to the fire, last Thursday, Jan. 26, Biedermann convened a "Homeland Security Summit" forum to better understand the supposed "critical threat of radical Islamic terrorism in Texas." The hearing, stacked with anti-Muslim figures, was rife with fearmongering and little evidence of actual immediate danger. The forum capped off with a profane rant from none other than former Texas Rep. **Molly White**, who during the advocacy day two years ago required Muslims visiting her office to "announce allegiance to America." When asked by a local reporter if Biedermann would also hold a forum on radical Christianity or radical Judaism, White shot back: "How dare you say that, you low-life son of a bitch!"

The same day, Muslim leaders, joined by legislators including **Donna Howard**, **Gina Hinojosa**, and **Celia Israel** (all from Austin), held a Capitol press conference to denounce Biedermann's survey, charged as being timed strategically close to the religious group's Capitol advocacy day. "Muslims feel this neo-Nazi type of letter is reminiscent of McCarthyism," said **Sarwat Husain** of CAIR. "It's very misleading, humiliating, intimidating, disgusting, and downright offensive." In a statement, **Rebecca Robertson**, ACLU of Texas legal and policy director, echoed the sentiment: "We don't have to look any further

than the grim history of the McCarthy era to appreciate the danger loyalty oaths pose to our Constitution."

With all the anti-refugee and anti-Muslim fervor at the Capitol and at the national level, it's an important hour to remember the facts about what kind of threat immigrants actually pose. The chance of an American citizen getting murdered in a terrorist attack caused by a refugee is 1 in 3.64 billion per year, according to a 2016 analysis from the Cato Institute, a Libertarian think tank. The chance of

being murdered in an attack by an undocumented immigrant is 1 in 10.9 billion per year. As for involvement by Muslims – since the 9/11 attacks through 2013, Muslimlinked terrorism killed 37 Americans in the same time period that 190,000 Americans were murdered, according to a 2014 study from the University of North Carolina. As a recent Vox article noted, you are more likely to be killed by your own clothes melting or igniting than by an immigrant terrorist. (A newfound dystopia reliant on "alternative facts" makes pressing these figures an uphill battle.)

What does seem to be a growing threat are **attacks on Muslim communities**. In 2016, the FBI reported a 67% oneyear surge in hate crimes against Muslims, the largest percentage jump among any group. Since Trump's election, anti-immigrant (first) and anti-Muslim (third) bias are the leading factors motivating hate crimes, according to the Southern Poverty Law Center. CAIR reports 2016 was the "worst year on record" for incidents in which mosques were targets of bias. While the cause is still under investigation in both cases, the recent fires that burned down Islamic centers in Victoria and right here in Lake Travis appear suspicious and should give us pause.

Undoubtedly, Biedermann and legislators who are considering other anti-Sharia law bills will only stoke growing Islamophobia. Some lawmakers, such as Rep. **Rafael Anchia**, D-Dallas, who filed a resolution condemning Trump's travel ban on Monday, will stand up to that bigotry. But at the Lege and in our nation's capital, it's the responsibility of all lawmakers – regardless of political party – to represent true American values and call for unity. It will be up to the thousands of citizen protesters to ensure that happens.

There was an unexpected moment at the close of the Muslim Capitol Day, when CAIR representative **Alia Salem** thanked President Trump and Biedermann. They are the ones who inspired the unprecedented crowd to show up, said Salem. "I am grateful to see that hate can turn into absolute love." -Mary Tuma

Frankly Un-American

IN TEXAS AND THE NATION, ISLAMOPHOBIA IS OUT OF HAND

More than 1,000 Texans representing groups of faith met at the Capitol on Tuesday, Jan. 31, to show solidarity with the Muslim community just days after President **Donald Trump** issued an executive order banning travel from seven Muslimmajority countries (Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, and Yemen) and halted the nation's refugee resettlement program. Activists linked arms to form a protective shield against anti-Muslim extremists while speakers, including local legislators, Mayor **Steve Adler**, and City Council Member **Greg Casar** (joined by colleagues **Alison Alter**, **Jimmy Flannigan**, and Mayor Pro Tem **Kathie Tovo**) reassured the crowd that they're welcome in both Austin and Texas.

"We stand alongside you in the fight for justice and equality and against cowardly Islamophobic and frankly un-American leadership," said Casar. He led gathered allies in proclamation: "No ban! No wall!"

With the exception of a few mild opponents, the state's Council on American-Islamic Relations' Muslim

Advocacy and Lobby Day could come at no better time. Islamophobia has officially swept over national politics. The Texas Legislature has seen its share of anti-Muslim hysteria this past week. Ahead of the annual event, freshman state Rep. Kyle Biedermann, R-Fredericksburg, sent out more than 400 "surveys" to Muslim student associations and mosque leaders across Texas, polling them for their support of "radical Islamic extremism." (Because no better way to identify terrorists than to politely ask them to identify themselves via the U.S. Postal Service.) The three-question loyalty oath asked Muslim residents if they support referring to the Muslim Brotherhood as a foreign terrorist organization; advocate for a "Muslim Reform Movement"; and pledge to honor the safety of former Muslims. While the survey was paid for by private funds, it could easily be mistaken as a government-sponsored document, igniting confusion and offense in Muslim leaders statewide.

CONGRESSIONAL FUN WITH GUNS

How is it possible that seven states have designated **official state firearms**, and none of those states are Texas? Two lawmakers are looking to change that. Last Thursday (Jan. 26), state Rep. **Mike Lang**, R-Granbury, announced House Concurrent Resolution 51 to designate the **1847 Colt Walker pistol** as the official handgun of the state of Texas. Lang writes that the single-shot revolver, designed in part by Texas Ranger Capt. Samuel Hamilton Walker, was "historically crucial to the early survival of the great State of Texas," having served the state valiantly during the Mexican-American War. The firearm was the first in the United States to hold six rounds, and is therefore the first to bear the name "six-shooter." That's all well and good, except a gun nut in the Senate would like to up the ante. On Jan. 11, via Senate Concurrent Resolution 8, Sen. **Don Huffines** proposed that the state adopt the goddamn **cannon** as its official state gun. (Take that, other states with their puny representative weapons.) The Dallas Republican, who's never met a firearm bill he doesn't like, says the "historic weapons serve as powerful reminders of our state's epic struggle for freedom," and further highlight "the unique heritage shared by all those who are proud to call Texas home." Only problem is you can't fit that thing into a holster. - *Chase Hoffberger*





SPARKS: FETAL BURIAL RULE "PRETEXT" FOR RESTRICTING ABORTION

U.S. Federal District Judge **Sam Sparks** took sharp aim at the state of Texas' flimsy defense of a rule that forces women to bury or cremate their fetal tissue after an abortion or miscarriage. In a 24-page order issued Friday, Jan. 27, that – again – halted the antichoice rule, Sparks (appointed to the bench in 1991 by former President **George H.W. Bush**) hit back at the state health department for proposing a regulation that may amount to a "pretext for restricting abortion access."

Sparks temporarily stopped the rule from taking effect on Dec. 19 ("Federal Judge Blocks Fetal Burial Rule ... For Now," Dec. 15), and again delayed its implementation in early January after a two-day court hearing ("State Offers No Evidence of Health Benefit During Fetal Burial Rule Hearing," Jan. 4).

In his scathing order Sparks called the rule "unconstitutionally vague" because it would allow "arbitrary and potentially discriminatory enforcement." The judge also criticized the state's timing of the rule, published just four days after losing to abortion providers at the **U.S. Supreme Court**. "Facing the threat of an unfavorable decision from the Supreme Court in Whole Woman's Health, the **Texas Department of State Health Services** (DSHS) began plans for the next battle. Before the ink on the Supreme Court's opinion in Whole Woman's Health was dry, DSHS had already drafted the amendments," wrote Sparks.


By the department's own admission, the regulation serves no public health benefit; instead its singular purpose is to "respect life and protect the dignity of the unborn," – a "weak purported benefit," Sparks wrote. With no legitimate state interest, there is evidence


DSHS's stated interest is actually a "pretext for its true purpose, restricting abortions." Furthermore, Sparks – hitting the nail on the head – called state officials out for attempting to define the start of human life as conception, which undermines liberty guaranteed in the Fourteenth Amendment.

Even if DSHS did have a legitimate interest, burdens on abortion access "substantially outweigh the benefits," Sparks wrote. DSHS provides only "simple, back-of-the-envelope math, which is unsupported by any research and relies heavily on assumptions," wrote Sparks in response to the department's claims that the rule would only impose minimal costs on abortion providers. The fact that abortion providers could only point to one vendor in all of Texas that would perform the services required by the rule gave Sparks reason to believe the regulation would "deliver a major, if not fatal, blow to healthcare providers performing abortions," and likely pose an undue burden on women seeking abortion.

In a statement following the order, **Amy Hagstrom Miller**, a plaintiff with *Whole Woman's Health*, said, "Judge Sparks saw past the state's claims and ruled on the right side of history. This ruling allows Texans to have the dignity to continue to make their own private health care decisions. ... We will not back down and are thrilled that we were victorious for Texans."

Sparks plans to set a trial date to issue a final ruling, but Attorney General **Ken Paxton**, an eager participant in the state's anti-choice crusade, has plans to appeal the temporary injunction directly to the conservative **U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals**. – *Mary Tuma*

In 2015, Gov. **Greg Abbott** signed into law two provisions expanding gun rights in Texas. With House Bill 910, Texas joined 14 other states that allow **open carry** of firearms in public spaces with a valid permit. Senate Bill 11 implemented **campus carry**. The two laws, widely praised by advocates as extensions of Texans' liberty, also ushered in a firestorm of opposition in Austin and around the state. Groups like **Texas Gun Sense** cold-called local businesses to see which ones would allow open carry on their grounds, hoping that economic consequences would affect businesses' choices – and in many cases it did. Lists, including one compiled in these pages, swelled with names of restaurants and businesses opting out.

Protests against campus carry were particularly robust at UT-Austin, where organizers were dogged in resisting a law that ultimately went into effect Aug. 1, 2016, the 50th

anniversary of **Charles Whitman**'s Tower shooting. On the first day of classes, **#CocksNotGlocks** protesters set off a fresh round of outrage that reverberated internationally. Gun advocates and Lege regulars scratched their heads at the level of opposition, many of them feeling the two laws functioned as a substitute for constitutional, or permitless, carry, the ultimate goal of many gun rights groups.

Constitutional carry finds itself on the legislative agenda this year. Rep. **Jonathan Stickland**, R-Bedford, has pledged his support for such a measure via HB 375, which would eliminate the licensing requirement for carrying a handgun, essentially deregulating open carry. Stickland announced his commitment to passing the law at a Jan. 23 press conference hosted by **Texans for Accountable Government** and **Lone Star Gun Rights**. "There's been a lot of education involved," he said, explaining why he believes the measure faces better odds this session than two years ago, when the pro-gun caucus was more fragmented. "There are a lot of groups that are coming together and saying, 'You know what? It's wrong that Texans have to beg for permission for their Second Amendment rights. It's wrong that we're forcing people to pay a fee and take a class for But Stickland may not have as much support as he suggests. **Andrea Brauer**, executive director of Texas Gun Sense, suggested the conservative representative is very much in the minority on the issue. Rather, she said, the priority among Capitol Republicans remains eliminating the licensing fees for open carry enthusiasts while leaving the class requirement in place, though no lawmaker has filed a bill quite yet. "I'm not hearing people say [permitless carry] is a priority except for Jonathan Stickland," she continued.

Brauer said her organization's efforts will be geared more toward tweaks to existing laws and support for two bills, Austin Rep. **Donna Howard**'s HB 631, which would bulk up firearm safety education, and **Joe Moody**'s HB 111, to create a campaign for state storage. TGS will also support measures to keep guns away from those with

mental illness, people with criminal records, and domestic abusers, and to criminalize straw purchases.

"Constitutional carry is a much bigger change than campus carry," Brauer said. "At least with campus carry – I'm not defending it – it said, 'You have to get a license, you have to get a background check, you have to pass a test. You have to be trained." With campus carry, there were at least some "safety things built in," she said. "Permitless carry is stripping all of

that away. It's just bad public policy for a lot of reasons."

Stickland has been defiant in his assertion of HB 375's popularity, saying in late January that "there's a whole bunch of people ... that are determined to be re-elected for whatever reason," and that he expects even legislative dissenters to buckle. "Even the ones who don't view the Second Amendment as a God-given right will respond accordingly and do the right thing, even if it's self-serving for them."

One advocate the Bedford representative likely will not have is state police. Law enforcement were generally opposed to open carry measures during the 2015 session. Former Austin Police Chief **Art Acevedo** has lobbied against the gun bills; the Texas Police Chiefs Association roundly rejected implementing open carry. **Ken Casaday**,

president of the Austin Police Association, told the *Chronicle* that open carry has been a "huge success" in practice, though he wouldn't like to see state gun laws further deregulated.

"I think the changes have been good, but I don't think it would be good to further push the envelope and allow people that right now are not allowed to carry, to carry," he said. "We have a process that works, and people need to use that." - Nina Hernandez

"AN INTENTIONAL SMOTHERING"

Tilon Carter faces execution on Tuesday, Feb. 7, after 10 years on death row. The 37-year-old was convicted of capital murder in a Tarrant County court in 2006 for the capital murder of **James Eldon Tomlin**.

their Second Amendment rights."

In April 2004, Carter and his girlfriend, **Leketha Allen**, robbed Tomlin, an 89-year-old retired veteran with jars of cash stashed throughout his home. Carter taped Tomlin's hands and legs together and covered his mouth with duct tape before the couple ransacked the house and stole \$6,000 and a shotgun. Tomlin's daughter discovered her father's body that day. An autopsy indicated Tomlin had been beaten and smothered, and died of positional asphyxiation.

Carter admitted before his trial that he planned to rob Tomlin, though he maintained that he did not mean to kill him. The Tarrant County medical examiner testified that it



wasn't exactly clear how Tomlin suffocated. The position and restraints were "consistent" with positional asphyxiation, but marks on the victim's lips "indicated an intentional smothering." Carter's history of misdemeanors and armed robbery made it easy for prosecutors to convince the jury that he was a career criminal. Carter pleaded not guilty. Jurors disagreed and sentenced him to death. Allen accepted a plea for 25 years in prison. She's eligible for parole this year. Carter's appeals have hinged on arguments that his trial attorneys failed to offer contradicting testimony regarding the cause and manner of Tomlin's death, thereby violating his Sixth Amendment right to effective counsel. Attorneys have also focused on the court's alleged failure to prove the death penalty was warranted (as opposed to life in prison), and that state law pertaining to a jury's right to know is in fact a violation of the Eighth and 14th amendments. Those appeals have all failed – most recently, last March, at the U.S. Supreme Court.

On Nov. 2, 2016, Carter's appellate attorney **Robin Norris** requested permission from a federal court to withdraw as Carter's attorney – at Carter's request. Norris wrote: "All judicial avenues for review of Mr. Carter's capital murder conviction and death sentence have been exhausted." What remained were procedural filings for clemency and commutation to the governor and state Board of Pardons and Paroles. Those, Norris suggested, could be taken over by new counsel. The court has not yet responded.

Carter is expected to be the third Texan executed this year. John Ramirez's execution, scheduled for today (Feb. 2), was stayed in a Corpus Christi federal court on Tuesday. Attorney **Gregory Gardner**, who played a crucial role in the stay of **Kosoul Chanthakoummane**'s execution last month, took over Ramirez's case Jan. 27. Judge **Nelva Gonzales Ramos** wrote in her order that "the short time remaining before Ramirez's execution" meant that the substitution of counsel "could only be given effect through a stay."

Last week, despite newly discovered forensic evidence, and proof that Dallas County prosecutors falsified evidence to secure a conviction, the Supreme Court denied **Terry Edwards**' last-minute appeal. He was executed Jan. 26 at 10:17pm, nearly four hours after his scheduled court-ordered time of death. – Sarah Marloff

Here in America the word "**fact**" has a straightforward, rather obvious meaning: Truth, reality, something that actually exists.








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It's Like a Jungle Sometimes

Beggars, hustlers, and dealers make you wonder how Red River music keeps from going under

"What you need?" asks the bent-back man staring at the hands of every night owl. *Excuse me*? "What you need, man?" The old man repeats himself through clenched teeth, leaning in toward me as I pass to reveal a stalactite of snot dangling from his wet nose.

I'm good, man, I tell him. It's after midnight on a cold Wednesday in early January. Red River Street looms as a gauntlet of lost hope. Two steps farther, a burly fellow seeks an investment partner. "Wanna go halves on a 10 of K2?" he asks. *I'll pass*. Three more steps and a man in a leather coat asks me for a cigarette. I tell him I don't have one. "Fuck you, you do," he shoots back. A spunout hippie stands at the street corner wearing a torn blanket over boxers.

"Hey brother," he prods. "Can you spare a dollar?" I offer a pair of old jeans that might fit him.

"Nah, it's cool." He shrugs, exposing to me a half-drunk bottle of Shiner. "Want a drink of this beer?"

Street scenes like this don't often raise my pulse, but I understand how it might freak out normals – people who don't make their living scrounging for music Downtown from club to club. Venue owners and club workers on Red River are growing increasingly worried that the legions of beggars, hustlers, drug dealers, and homeless are creating an unappealing business environment on the walkable music strip. With rental prices in Austin's central business district increasing faster than those citywide, Downtown clubs now need to

appeal to wider audiences – a challenging task when the music district overlaps with Austin's centralized consortium of transients.

"It's a recipe for shit," quipped one veteran police source who requested anonymity. "This area being central for both tourists and the homeless makes it conducive to begging, drug dealing, and robbery."

In late November, officers at the Austin Police Department exacerbated the concerns of venue operators when a few were interviewed for a KVUE-TV news segment warning Austin residents against walking alone Downtown at night, citing an increase in violent crime. Weeks later, Beerland's Max Meehan still took issue with the edict. "Thanks for the PR, fuck faces!" he said.

LIFE IN THE SEWER

Have you ever cleaned up human shit? "I did it every day when we moved in," said Jason McNeely, co-owner of Barracuda, a popular venue on Seventh Street. "People still shit by the back door all the time. I can't tell you how many times I've cleaned up shit and condoms at the same time – condoms

that are sitting on piles of human shit! It's un-fuckin'-real. Red River is a sewer."

McNeely holds a stake in Eastside punk club Hotel Vegas, and has lived in some tough neighborhoods in both Philadelphia and New York City. He said running a business on Red River (Barracuda opened December 2015) has been the most frustrating environment he's ever encountered. "I've never seen as much piss, shit, prostitution, and open drug use as I do on Red River right now," he said.

It's the same for other venue operators in the area. Meehan, now a talent booker, has worked at Beerland since 2003. "I've had people pull knives on me, pull guns on me, routinely seen sexual favors happening in the alleyway." he said. "If you go down there during the day, you'll see people who do drugs, blast music, and hang out in the alleyway between Beerland and Sidewinder. If you look at some of the men, they're fuckin' ripped. And there's no weight set at the ARCH. These are people who've just gotten out of prison and they're angry and it can be terrifying for people, so it deters foot traffic."

One cop who spoke with the *Chronicle* affirmed Meehan's suggestion that a considerable portion of the Downtown transient population are career criminals who've been paroled to Austin and dropped out of transitional housing. An open records request filed with Texas' Department of Criminal Justice indicates that 586 state prisoners were paroled to Austin in 2016. Of that number, 150 had not previously lived in the Austin area, and 29 hadn't provided any home address during their incarceration.

The same alley Meehan references also touches the back door of the Empire Control Room & Garage, another live music staple. "The stuff that happens back there would make your skin crawl," said Stephen Sternschein, Empire's owner, who's also president of the Red River Merchants Association. "There's no cameras down there It's an incredibly great place if you're a drug dealer or user to get high and engage in whatever illicit things you want to do to be out of the eyes of the police or community."

Sternschein said he's asked the city, which owns the alley, to clean it up, offer protection, or put up a fence, but he said city officials have refused because the path is considered an emergency exit for surrounding businesses. Practically speaking, it's more often used as an emergency toilet.

"There's human fecal matter that trickles into my club through the back door that I have to clean up every day," said Sternschein. "We've gotten tickets because there were people high on drugs sleeping in front

of our emergency exit doors. There are places all over this area that are overrun with transients."

Across the street and two blocks north, Maggie Lea, a partner at Cheer Up Charlies, reports recently being verbally harassed – racially and sexually – by a homeless man on Red River. Lea's already slapped a restraining order on one guy who jumped

out in front of her car as if he was being hit, then used the near-collision as a pretense to extort her for money and torment her staff.

From Sixth Street to 10th Street, every club owner in the area offers essentially the same sentiment. Here's Sternschein: "This isn't a homeless issue. There's a group of people who need help and receive help. Then there's a group of people who prey on those folks. CONTINUED ON P.22

This issue is those predators: the professional transients that have become so brazen. And the police seem like they've given up.

"There's nothing more unifying than the experience everyone down here has ... cleaning up the piss and shit of transient people that gets left on our doorsteps every day and every night. Our female staff can't walk to their cars by themselves at 3am. Even if you come down during the day, there's aggressive panhandling. Being part of the Red River Cultural District means spending an obligatory 10 minutes at the beginning of any conversation sharing the most recent horrible experience that's been had with somebody who's high on drugs, selling drugs, or doing something completely undesirable."

McNeely said that the scene has had an adverse effect on business within the district. "My clientele doesn't want to hang out on the street because it's not safe," he said. "Ultimately, I don't think we'll be able to survive if the streets stay like this."

WE COULD THRIVE

In October 2013, after a widely circulated petition and campaign from the nonprofit Austin Music People, City Hall consented to officially recognize the stretch of Red River Street between Sixth Street and 12th Street as an official cultural district. The street became a hotbed of underground music in the Nineties, and by the time Council's decree came around it had become one of the densest strips of live music clubs in the entire country. But while that was happening, rooms like 710 and Headhunters had closed, and venues up and down the street were suffering staggering rent increases that eventually displaced stalwarts like Holy Mountain and Red 7.

Today, the cultural district stands as the most important entertainment stretch in Austin, but losing venue density remains a concern for local stakeholders. Most of the clubs are doing decent business and can remain marginally sustainable through diehard music fans, but engaging Austin's growing population could prove the difference between renewing or folding when current leases expire.

"Take a neighborhood like Rainey Street," McNeely said. "Look at how they're thriving. You see all these other neighborhoods thriving too, like West Sixth and Cesar Chavez, where you don't have that crime and harassment on the street. Austin is one of the biggest draws for tourism in the nation and the music nightlife culture is a big part of that draw, but there isn't any practical application coming to our aid.

"What musicians need, for starters, is venues to play in. More than that, they need venues that have resources needed to give them an appropriate platform ... to perform at their best. Austin has that, but the margin for profit for venues is so much smaller, and costs are so much higher. The Red River venues aren't asking for handouts, we're just asking for the city to help create a safe environment."

Sternschein sees potential in the RRCD becoming a high-value tourist corridor, but doubted that would happen if the city can't find a way to deal with transient populations and safety issues in the district. "People will only come to Red River from 9pm until 2am, and it's outside of those hours that's the problem," he said. "If we're ever going to make something work with rising rents, we need to be able to operate outside those hours. The first step in that is cleaning up the streets."

Club owners believe that Austin's increasing Downtown density could translate into successful happy hour business, but as of now, few venues are able to draw any kind of afternoon audience. "It's not comfortable!" bemoaned McNeely. "You can't walk down Red River without being confronted in some negative way."

Meanwhile, any notion that the throngs of transients on Red River are staving off affordability issues and incoming development remains pure fallacy. A combination Hotel Indigo/Holiday Inn Express opened on Red River in 2016 across from Stubb's. Hyatt House is currently going up behind Cheer Up Charlies. Venue leases don't get renewed without a sizable increase in rent.

BARRACUDA

"Here's the backroom conversation that we used to have around here," revealed Sternschein. "By having these issues we're preserving our ability to have this cultural experience in the district, because if the ARCH or Caritas weren't here the hotels and condo people would have already gobbled it up. So in a twisted way, the problems that we're having have saved the district. But that mindset has proven untrue by the two hotels that have just gone up in the district, and rent is higher than ever."

ZOMBIES ON SPICE

Referring to K2 as "synthetic marijuana" is an affront to cannabis plants everywhere. The latter doesn't render you drooling, incoherent, and mentally vacant like the chemical compound known as "spice." Those who

work and play Downtown routinely spot hordes of spicedout zombies - gone-inthe-eyes and swaying after a blunt. Last summer, a semi-homeless crack-cocaine addict with a long history Downtown told me the drug's grown so popular because "it's cheap, easy to get, and doesn't get you arrested." In

actuality, synthetic cannabinoids have been illegal in Texas since September 2015, and possession ranges from a misdemeanor to a felony depending on the quantity on one's person. Chances are the guy was referring to police enforcement.

Medics are all too familiar with K2. On a single day in August, Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services treated 52 people who'd lost consciousness from a bad batch of spice – the largest, but hardly only incident of mass K2 overdosing over the last year. All told in 2016, ATCEMS treated 1,611 K2 overdoses.

"K2 is a despicable, nasty drug," said Troy Gay, an assistant chief at APD. "People are putting products in it that you and I spray on plants ... to kill [the plants]. And because of its cheapness and the effect it gives people, it targets those who are homeless. We have people – vultures – who come down to this area and prey on our most vulnerable – the homeless – and sell them K2. Those are the people we want to arrest."

Gay said if a person is high on K2 but doesn't have the drug on them, the only thing police can do is charge them with public intoxication if they are deemed a threat to themselves or others. APD targets K2 dealers. Putting homeless in jail for efforts to mentally escape homelessness is far from a departmental crusade. Gay said such an effort "isn't the best answer for homeless people with addiction and mental issues."

APD has had some success lately with

K2 trafficking. "A few months back we arrested 45 people for K2 delivery, and we did another 30 recently," Gay said. The department often disguises officers as homeless people, he said, to make undercover purchases from spice dealers. "It's hard," Gay said. "We have to get the drugs tested, processed, then we get the

warrants and go out and arrest them."

Despite those arrests, McNeely still reports seeing both spice and crack get sold every afternoon around the corner from his business. He described a scene of three young males set up by the large tree between Waller Creek and Koriente, with 10 to 20 homeless people huddled around them, looking to score. "They all line up and they divvy up the drugs – this is every day," he said. "And any day, anytime, you can see people passing out from synthetic drugs on the street near our businesses. In my opinion, the reason it's so prevalent in that area is that it's so easy for them. There's no one there to make it not convenient."



Gav said a solution may be found in increased collaborations between citizens and police. "We need people who are willing to say no, call the police, and identify those folks," he said. "We need people who will say, 'These people are not here for services. They're down here preying on people who need help."

A HAVEN FOR HOPE?

The epicenter of Austin's transient population is a two-block stretch between Seventh Street, Eighth Street, Trinity Street, and Red River. That's where all the services are. Those needing sustenance can eat breakfast and lunch at Caritas and the Trinity Center, and dinner at the Salvation Army. In the middle sits the most well known of homeless service providers: the Austin Resource Center for the Homeless (ARCH), a landmark made all the more recognizable by the dozens of impoverished people who post up along its outside walls each day.

When I visited the ARCH in late December, I found a positive environment operating under progressive leadership. The 500 people who utilize the ARCH each day receive a basic supply of needs: food, water, bathrooms, and showers. There's the lobby, a safe, judgment-free place to chill out during daytime hours; charging stations for electronics; a computer lab for job hunting; mental health services and addiction groups; lockers so you don't have to drag your pack to an interview; and daytime sleeping quarters complete with white noise machines. At night, the facility, which houses nine nonprofits (most notably Front Steps) turns into a men's emergency shelter built to house 100 - but it's augmented with bedrolls on the floor to sleep 230. ARCH organizers say the facility turns away 30 to 40 people each night. Often, a partnering church will house a few of them.

Such accommodations raise the question of why one will always find so many homeless people outside the ARCH. According to Front Steps Executive Director Mitchell Gibbs, who cited multiple censuses of the homeless population, 75% of those outside

individuals do not use the ARCH's services whatsoever. They're a complex demographic, likely comprised of individualistic homeless campers, victims of Texas' underfunded mental health system, career criminals, and people with addiction issues. The ARCH, which operates on federal and state funding, employs five private security guards during daytime hours, but holds no authority over those camped outside on the street. "Our legal authority ends when people leave the building," said Gibbs. "We don't have control over what happens outside. APD does."

Gibbs suggested that APD could help the ARCH by better taking care of the criminal activity. "We need the same level of response to that activity that we would receive anywhere else," he said. "It's difficult to be homeless and not in some way participating in a criminal activity just by virtue of being homeless - where can you sit, lie down, go to the bathroom. But beyond that, if you're using, selling, or distributing illegal drugs, if you are participating in prostitution, there are penalties that we as citizens expect to be enforced.'

Gibbs framed the department's involvement with the ARCH as a gradual decline since its opening. "When the ARCH was built in [2004], there was a police substation included in the planning, and officers sta-tioned in the building," he said. "That changed to park rangers. Then, when there were budget cuts at APD, they removed the police substation with continued promise that there will be a vehicle parked outside the building to prevent crime. Then they needed that vehicle, so it became a promise of increased patrols in our area?

APD runs a HALO camera outside the ARCH so police can monitor activity from nearby headquarters. There's also a cityemployed security guard outside the shelter throughout the day. Still, while local homeless rates were declining from 2011 to 2015, Gibbs saw the population outside the ARCH continue to grow.

"With gentrification and the expansion of housing density, these things that are CONTINUED ON P.24

changes around us, people who may have been campers before have been forced out of the campsite," he explains. "Where are they going to go? Where are they going to be allowed to be? People may not be pleased with it, but our community has allowed those people to come Downtown. Even if they're not seeking services here. There's a homemade tent camping thing across the street, on the LAZ Parking area. Police know it's there. It's been there for a couple weeks now. That would not be allowed to happen in West Lake."

The three most used words in any conversation about homelessness Downtown are "move," "the," and "ARCH." That form of NIMBYism's gone on since before the shelter opened.

"No neighborhood wanted it, but having Salvation, Caritas, and Trinity in the area made good sense, and the city was able to secure this property," said Gibbs. "That conversation has happened repeatedly over time. 'Let's move it.' So you going to pluck one service element out of the middle of other service elements? Now people who need shelter would have to travel to that? That's assuming that you could find a neighborhood that would take it, particularly now with a 10-1 Council environment."

Seeking a solution, Gibbs points south, to San Antonio. In 2010, a 37-acre campus called Haven for Hope opened west of

downtown there – effectively moving all of the city's homeless services into one place, away from the center city. It's had such a marked early effect that more than 200 representatives from other cities have visited seeking to replicate it. Gibbs said San Antonio's public-private venture was devised and partially financed by former Valero CEO Bill Greehey. Such a solution would require significant land, money, and community agreement.

THE SOUND OF THE POLICE

On a sunny afternoon in December, Gay stood at the corner of Seventh and Red River assessing the difficult convergence of transients and nightlife. "Homelessness is not a crime," he said. "We don't enforce status-related issues. So our job is to protect the homeless that are here and weed out those who are taking advantage of them with criminal behaviors."

I asked if that proves a difficult distinction. "Yes," Gay said. "That's why we look at criminal actions, not the way people look or the way they walk."

Gay said that a lot of crime is focused around a 1,000-foot radius of the Seventh and Red River corner, especially during late hours. He noted a 10% increase in violent crime in 2016, a figure that's reflected citywide, with aggravated assaults and robberies "the focused crimes in this area."

"We also have aggressive panhandling," he said. "Those are the things we're really trying to focus our efforts on." He cited officer presence as the biggest impact on "deterring those crimes from occurring."

Red River stakeholders are less than enthusiastic about APD's presence in the area. Meehan, who recently stopped working on-site, notes how often he'd see "dudes lighting up crack pipes in front of Sidewinder" while a cop cruises by in his squad car. "How does this guy ... not see that?" he asked. "And how does he not stop? And how does he not deal with it?"

Meehan believes police inaction is due to the department's decision to deliberately overlook crimes perpetrated by those who can't pay their citations. "Art Acevedo brought a very clinical approach to generating income for the city," he charged. "If there's a rich, white dude wearing a [University of Oklahoma] sweater with a beer in his hand, and across the street there's some homeless guy with a can of Steel Reserve ranting and screaming sexual insults at women as they walk by, who do you think the police are going to pop? The guy in the sweater, because he can pay! Meanwhile the guy who's making women nervous gets ignored because he doesn't generate income. It's a priority issue with the police. They only go after what is lucrative."

Pressed, Gay said that he understands Meehan's perception, but rebuked it as untrue. "People believe we don't do anything with the homeless. Believe it or not, the only option isn't taking them to jail," he

said. "We try to de-escalate situations. We try to ensure if somebody has too much to drink maybe there's someone who can take them home and take care of them. Or, as a last resort, sometimes we have to make an arrest. You have to look at the totality of everything. It isn't based on whether they're homeless or if they're in from out of town. It's based on what's going on at that particular moment and if that action

is going to stop if we leave."

Meehan believes the most effective way to improve Red River's environment is to have a consistent presence of police doing walking patrols. Downtown cops focus on Sixth Street, especially during nights and weekends (see "Sixth Street Showdown," Feb. 26, 2016). Sternschein also notes a need for an on-foot police presence along Red River. He acknowledges that he sees two beat cops more often, though the stretch is simply one of many on their 10-hour shift.

Gay, too, recognizes an increased need for police presence. "Officer presence is the number one way we can deter crime," he said. "We already have some [patrol officers working Red River], but we need to be smarter about it and have them there at the right time." Over the past two years, APD has added 20 officers to its Downtown Area Command staff. "Our goal is to take the limited resources we have and put them in this area on a more constant basis to address challenges going on."

But Meehan's not buying it. "They'll say there's a lack of police resources, and meanwhile you're going to find all the cops on Dirty Sixth flirting with drunk girls," he said.

Asked if the many officers stationed on Sixth Street factors into how many officers are made available for Red River, Gay said: "It does, but we're looking at different deployment strategies.

"Everyone focuses their efforts on Sixth Street because that's where there are fights and class C misdemeanors when bars are closing, but we're having people getting robbed and aggravated assaults – felony offenses – over here."

APD has shown a propensity for showing up at less-than-coincidental times to clear the Red River area of drug dealers and loiterers. In November, before the Waller Creek Conservancy's annual "Creek Show," McNeely recorded video footage of the sidewalk outside the ARCH completely devoid of loiterers. Sternschein called Red River "a different district for that week, and all it was was a consistent presence in the area."

Gay told the Chronicle that he didn't specifically recall any departmental plan to clean up the street for the Conservancy event. "On occasion we have to clean the sidewalks, but on a constant basis we're always trying to address things with creative solutions," he said. "But I'll go back to this point: We don't want to penalize people here to seek services, so we have to come up with a balanced approach about protecting people who are here legally - homeless or not – while pulling the criminal element out of the haystack. If we simply pushed all these homeless people out, where would they go? The neighborhood to the east? The neighborhood to the west? North? South? We'd just have to deal with other areas."

ILL COMMUNICATION

Sternschein said Empire employees called the police 300 different times in a recent one-month span. "When we see things we do call," he said. "When we see officers on the street, we let them know what's going on." He said APD was usually quick to respond to potentially life-threatening situations, like when someone was stumbling around "high on something" with a loaded gun. But when the complaint is just about someone aggressively panhandling, he finds it hard to get good help. "The Red River Merchants Association has gone to town hall meetings with APD and called 311 and 911 when appropriate. I don't want to say we're not getting anywhere, but we're not where we need to be by a long shot."

To Meehan, there's no working relationship between the police and club employees on Red River. "They don't care about the businesses, which shows you they don't care about people paying really high alcohol taxes and rent, because it's not cheap to run a business down there," he said. "I don't understand the mentality. When you get off the airplane in Austin, what do you see? A plaque that says 'Welcome to the Live Music Capital of the World!' And there's absolutely no perspective there."

Gay said sustainable, long-term solutions for the Downtown area will require cooperation between the police and businesses in the district. "There could be better communication," he said. He encouraged businesses: "Don't give up."

"I know they've been down here for a while and thrown their hands up," he said. "Try to work with us. Try to come up with solutions. We're not going away, and we're going to make this the best Downtown we can. But we can't do it without people walking side by side with us."

Suspicions Confirmed

Schools' standardized tests are often criticized as harmfully rigid, and in the latest version of the Texas Education Agency's STAAR test, poet Sara Holbrook said she flubbed the "correct" answer for "author motivation" – in two of her own poems that were on the test. Writing for Huffington Post in January, a disheartened Holbrook lamented, "Kids' futures and the evaluations of their teachers will be based on their ability to guess the so-called correct answer to [poorly] made-up questions."

Compelling Explanations

In December, James Leslie Kelly, 52, and with a 37-conviction rap sheet dating to 1985, filed a federal lawsuit in Florida claiming that his latest brush with the law was Verizon's fault and not his. Kelly was convicted of stealing the identity of another James Kelly and taking more than \$300 in Verizon services. He bases his case on the Verizon sales representative's having spent "an hour and a half" with him – surely enough time, he says, to have figured out that he was not the James Kelly he was pretending to be. He seeks \$72 million.

In Hong Kong in December, Mr. Lam Chung-kan, 37, pleaded guilty to stealing a bottle of a co-worker's breast milk at work and drinking it – but only to help with "stress" in his job as a computer technician. Undermining the health-improvement explanation was a photo Lam sent the woman, showing himself in an aroused state.

Ironies

London's The Guardian reported in January that "dozens" of people have been charged or jailed recently for "defaming" the new Myanmar government, which has been headed (in a prime minister-like role) since April by Aung San Suu Kyi, who was elected after her release from house detention following two decades of persecution for criticizing the longtime military regime. For her struggle for free speech, Suu Kyi was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1991. Said the wife of the latest arrestee, Myo Yan Naung Thein, on trial for "criminal defamation" of Suu Kyi's regime, "This is not insulting - this is just criticizing, with facts. This is freedom of speech."

The Litigious Society

High Finance: Sometime in 2006, a photographer on assignment roamed a Chipotle restaurant in Denver, snapping photos of customers. Leah Caldwell was one person photographed, but says she refused to sign the photographer's "release" – and was surprised, nevertheless, to see a photo of herself in a Chipotle promotion in 2014 and again in 2015 (and on her table in the photo were "alcoholic beverages" she denied ever ordering). In January, Caldwell said the misuse of her image is Chipotle's fault for ignoring her non-"release," and thus that she is entitled to all of the profits Chipotle earned between 2006 and 2015: \$2.237 billion.

Precocious

In December, Ashlynd Howell, age 6, of Little Rock, Ark., deftly mashed her sleeping mother's thumbprint onto her phone to unlock the Amazon app and order \$250 worth of *Pokémon* toys. Mom later noticed 13 email confirmations and asked Ashlynd if something was amiss. According to the *Wall Street Journal* report, Ashlynd said, "No, Mommy, I was shopping."

Leading Economic Indicators

The British think tank High Pay Centre reported in January that the average CEO among the UK's top 100 companies (in the Financial Times Stock Exchange index) earns the equivalent of around \$1,600 an hour – meaning that a 12-hour-a-day boss will earn, by midday Jan. 4, as much money as the typical worker at his firm will earn the entire year. (Around the same time, the anti-poverty organization Oxfam reported, to an astonished press, that eight men – six Americans, headed by Bill Gates – have the same total "net worth" as the 3.6 billion people who comprise the poorest half of the planet.)

An organization that tracks "high net worth" investors (Spectrem Group of Lake Forest, III.) reported recently that, of Americans worth \$25 million or more, only about two-thirds donate \$10,000 or more yearly to charity. And then there is Charles Feeney, 85, of New York City, who in December made his final gift to charity (\$7 million to Cornell University), completing his pledge to give away almost everything he had - \$8 billion. (He left his wife and himself \$2 million to live on, in their rental apartment in San Francisco.) A January New York Times profile noted that nothing is "named" for Feeney, that the gifts were mostly anonymous, and that Feeney assiduously cultivated his low profile.

People Different From Us

"Every major event in my life has been about insects," Aaron Rodrigues, 26, told The New York Times in December, home in New York City during a winter break from his doctoral research at Purdue University on the "sweet tergal secretions" of German cockroaches, and on his way to buy a supply of crickets and hornworms. ("Hornworms," he said, have an "amazing defense" where they "eat tobacco for the nicotine, which they exhale as a gas to scare away predators.") "When I'm feeling stressed out," Rodriques said, he might take one out to "calm me down." He met his first girlfriend when she was attracted to his pet giant African millipede (as long as a human forearm), but admits that "for the vast majority" of time in school, "I was alone."





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Fast, Cheap, and in Control

How LOLA, Revel, Rude Mechs, and Jennifer Sherburn are doing more shows with less - like one every month

OK, class, here's a pretty basic equation: Rapidly escalating rents plus sharp increases in the costs of living and of making art plus decrease in adequate spaces for showing that art equals ...? Logic would suggest a reduction in the number of arts events. I mean, math, right? So, then, with resources for artists in Austin shrinking as rents are skyrocketing and venues are closing, how do you explain Jennifer Sherburn's 11:11, her project to premiere 11 dances in 11 months? Or the monthly programs on offer this season from the Rude Mechs and Local Opera, Local Artists? Or Revel Unclassified, a series of 22 concerts presented in as many weeks?

That's right, four local companies have responded to our current crises in afford-

ability and arts venues by creating more art, not less. It's a counterintuitive move given the circumstances, but it's also a classic Austin move - "When vou don't have much. doing something big forces you to be more creative," a strategy that can be traced through such ATX success stories as Joe Sears and Jaston Williams' Greater Tuna, Rick Linklater's Slacker, and Robert Rodriguez's El Mariachi. These new rapid-fire performing arts

series are pushing the groups producing them toward working in nontraditional spaces, expanding collaborations, and connecting more casually - and closely - with audiences. And in every instance, the artists are finding substantial payoffs: building on their body of work, attracting new audiences, and garnering more attention at a time when, as Lana Lesley of the Rude Mechs says, "The arts in Austin and we artists are slipping away, getting edged out."

"We get to see and be in Austin all year. We get to kiss people we like to see. We get to laugh a lot," says fellow Rude Kirk Lynn, ticking off the benefits of the company's monthly series, a mash-up of readings and workshops of new work, screenings and a

stage revival of past work, celebrations, and symposia. "We get to share our past, our present, and our future. And I do think a lot of people feel more connected to us. I also think we're making more new work than we have in 15 years maybe."

The inspirations for these series are varied. The Rudes were hitting their 20th anniversary as a theatre collective and collectively agreed, says Lesley, "to stay home not tour - for the whole year and just party. Which led us to deciding to pepper the year with small monthly events that would appeal to the different segments of our audience." For Local Opera, Local Artists, a company that's still rather new and channels most of its energy into one big show a year, a monthly series was "a way to engage

artists and the community more regularly," says founding Executive Liz Producer Cass. lo-fi, low-pressure Jennifer Sherburn, who felt "divided" between her full-time job and her choreographic career, wanted to take a risk on behalf of her art, to make a full-time audience will come dance project that would to them. and that "engage more communities and open the doors wide for new collaborations." For Carla LANA LESLEY OF THE McElhaney, co-founder of the chamber music group Revel, it was another

opportunity to act on her lifelong interest in "humanizing the classical music concert experience." She says that she's "always thinking about ways to draw the audience in and take them on a journey, whether it's through inventive programming, the use of themes, collaboration with artists from other mediums, bringing them into more comfortable and inviting spaces, or a combination of all of the above." After performing with an Albuquerque, N.M., group that ran what it called the "Church of Beethoven" - Sunday morning concerts mixing music and poetry, presented in "a cozy, eclectically furnished, funky warehouse" with a coffee



bar - McElhaney began to think about how she could adapt the idea for Austin. The result, Revel Unclassified, is still weekly and on Sundays, but it's a little later than "church time" and the beverage of choice is craft beer - brewed on-site at the 4th Tap Brewing Cooperative on Metric.

The idea of presenting classical music in a brewery taproom was as appealing to Cass as it was to McElhaney, and both LOLA and Revel run their series out of 4th Tap, in part because the owners, John and Erin Stecker, are really supportive of both series, in part because the taproom has a baby grand already in place. Cass first saw 4th Tap while on a bicycle pub crawl about a year ago, she says, and it was love at first sight: "The minute I walked in and saw that glorious space complete with a baby grand piano, I knew we needed to be making music there. I reached out to [John and Erin], and they were absolutely game for anything. You really find this in Austin. When you are an organization that does not have a brick-and-mortar, every space you enter becomes a potential performance space. I find it to be liberating, creative, and, of course, challenging."

Sherburn encountered a similar response in seeking spaces for 11:11, which she intended to be performed at a number of different venues. "I spoke to friends and various business owners in town that I discovered were willing to open their doors to us," she says. "We have been incredibly lucky to have partnered with people in the community who have been extremely generous to host our performance and provide rehearsal space." Among the partnerships that the choreographer considers integral to the success of 11:11 is the one with lighting designer-producer Natalie George. "We have to consider sustainability and costeffectiveness due to the quick turnarounds between shows. Together, we are implementing a system that seems to be working well, almost like being on tour."

Of course, a monthly or weekly series can necessitate some changes to the usual way of working. For all of the groups here, programs are scaled down, which helps reduce costs and facilitates quick turnarounds. Even so, the pace is a challenge all its own. "The creative process is fast and furious," says Sherburn, though that isn't always as restrictive or inhibiting as you might imagine. She says, "It's liberating to think quick and feel comfortable letting go." And McElhaney is in wholehearted agreement: "This is about the best way that I can think of to overcome the creative paralysis that often accompanies our desire to produce a 'perfect' event. When we are producing something weekly, we have no time to suffer over the finer details of whether this piece or that is the best way to convey the meaning we're after – we simply have to go with our gut instincts and get it out there. We are called upon to be more in the moment. It's a raw, powerful way to work. It puts the emphasis off of perfection and squarely on authenticity, where it belongs."

Working without that constant emphasis on perfection also frees up the artists to enjoy themselves in ways they might not in a traditional show. Speaking for the Rudes,

Cass also feels that doing this kind of series has taught her a lot. "LOLA at 4th Tap has been a great learning tool about the flow of an arts season. The space is great for larger or smaller crowds, which always makes for a different experience each time we're there. Sometimes concerts are wildly energized and sometimes they are warm

and cozy." However, she says, she might not have taken on this kind of fast, cheap, and out of control series without the inspiration of the city's other audaciously venturesome artists. "There is so much great stuff happening in Austin and the creativity is contagious," she says. "I wouldn't be doing half the stuff I'm doing if I wasn't inspired by other artists and arts organizations in town. They made me realize that LOLA could exist and that you really can make your own art happen. Dreams are very easy to have, but making dreams happen, really seeing them through, is a whole other animal. A crazy, wild, sweaty, living, breathing, dream creature.'

History Repeats

The smart script and remarkable ensemble work make Zach Theatre's *The Great Society* a powerful look at LBJ

Theatre companies typically plan their seasons out well in advance, making decisions about their choice of plays, casting, and other aspects of production months before the shows actually open. That Zach Theatre's staging of *The Great Society* feels as timely as it does is a sign of both great foresight on the part of the company and its ability to shift this production in a very specific direction.

The play is about LBJ, starting with his victory in the 1964 election and running the course of that presidential term. Like its forerunner, the Tony Award-winning *All the Way*, which covered Johnson's first day as

president through his www.zac election, it's a version of Throu history, albeit one that's Running tim well-researched, and it's helpful to remember

that the play is in many ways a fable with specific ideas we're meant to take away from it.

The first of three acts showcases the political skill of President Johnson (Steve Vinovich) as he launches his cascade of social programs meant to attack poverty in America. Two small cracks appear in his administration. One is the conflict in Vietnam, to which LBJ's Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara (Miles Chick) recommends sending a small force, predicting that North Vietnam will soon negotiate and the conflict will fall into obscurity. LBJ follows the advice, lighting a long, long fuse that he can never bring himself to put out. The other is the struggle for civil rights under Martin Luther King Jr. (Cecil Washington

Jr.), which undergoes some of its most famous episodes in this period and exposes what is at best a rocky partnership between King and Johnson. The latter scenes are rendered powerfully here through the smart script by Robert Schenkkan and Zach's

remember Alexander's voice in the several songs is a thing of beauty and power.

As the play moves forward, the parallels between then and now begin to appear. King leads a movement based on the urgent needs of his community and of the country, but key supporters of LBJ's presidency, such as Mayor Daley in Chicago (James Davies), are intent on resisting the tide of history. As with the Black Lives Matter movement,



King will not and cannot stop pushing for change. When Nixon becomes the Republican nominee and promises "law and order," a dog whistle to whites who feel oppressed in the face of deepening unrest, it's clear that playwright Schenkkan wants to show that history repeats itself.

Does it? Is it doing so now? Who can say? On the evening this review was written, current events were unfolding so fast that any kind of immediate analysis seemed laughable. Maybe in six months or a year we'll be able to tell if the presidency after LBJ's and the present one are fair equivalents – should we still be here to wonder.

We know what happened in history, though. Spoiler alert: Nixon became president, and Johnson saw his vision for a Great Society doomed by reactionary forces on both the right and left. As painful as it may feel to be re-entering an era of corruption in the White House on par with Nixon's, what Schenkkan proposes in *The Great Society* is actually an optimistic vision: History may be cyclical, but someday the light will shine again.

The play concludes with a line and a gesture that clearly mark where Zach Artistic Director Dave Steakley and his company stand on the state of the union. Steakley typically seeks to connect theatre with the thoughts and feelings of this community, and that practice has met with varying success in the past. Here, however, with the remarkable ensemble work and the deliberate message with which the play concludes, he has presented one of his most powerful productions.

THE DAUGHTER OF THE REGIMENT Dell Hall at the Long Center, 701 W. Riverside www.austinopera.org Through Feb. 5 Running time: 2 hr., 40 min.

From the opening strains of the overture to Donizetti's comic romance *The Daughter of the Regiment*, you know things are not going to go as planned, no matter how careful the preparation. A sweet, romantic swoon of a melody competes with brash martial interruptions, and when the curtain flies up, we find out why: In the beautiful Tyrolean Alps, Napoleon's French fighters are on the march. Local peasants fret and pray. The Marquise de Birkenfeld is on the run, her overburdened butler Hortensio huffing and puffing in her wake. Whatever will they do?

Invading armies might be harbingers of doom; then again, these soldiers are French. And when you put French soldiers onstage, those same ferocious fighters usually turn into dashing and honorable men who like to engage in a good deal of fun - often with a tankard in hand. So it is with the 21st Regiment. And yet, this charming opera offers an even brighter touch: a young woman, Marie, the regiment's foundling "daughter," whom its members have raised as one of their own. She's as swashbuckly as the guys, except now she's fallen in love. The subject of her affection is Tonio, a local peasant who saved her life. No sooner does she mention his name than in he's dragged, captured by her father-figure fighters as he risked his life searching for her, the girl of his dreams.

The rest of the opera, like the overture, bounces back and forth between Marie and Tonio's sweet romance and the martial interruptions of parental types (mostly the regiment's leader Sulpice and the aforementioned Marquise) as they try to define the kids' futures, with the kids doing their best to forge a future of their own. Allegiances are swapped, uniforms are traded for the trappings of nobility, and outdoors becomes indoors as we move from mountains to drawing room. It ends well.

Holding it all together is wonderful music, delightfully performed by the Austin Opera orchestra under the baton of Richard Buckley and robustly sung by all. Donizetti set some particular challenges to his tenor, and René Barbera in the role of Tonio delivers brilliantly. Barbera gives the impression that his singing is effortless, his "Ah! mes amis," an aria noted as one of the toughest in the repertory, is fluid and passionate.

A perfect counterpart to Barbera's peasant lover is soprano Rachele Gilmore as Marie. At times impish, fierce, tender, even goofy, Gilmore brings the regimental daughter to life, an energetic young woman ready for (almost) anything. Her singing is exquisite, particularly when she bids "adieu" to her patron platoon in the moving "II faut partir," before being whisked away from a world of epaulettes and men to the restrictive salons of etiquette and a puffy white dress.

Once the story heads indoors, this production undergoes a shift toward broad comedy. The opening of the second act features a ballet of manners, as poor Marie is put through her paces in order to smooth the rough edges of a girl who's grown up among soldiers. The trio that follows is loads of fun, as the increasingly fraught Marquise attempts to teach the girl to sing properly, despite Sulpice's not-so-subtle melodic interjections of the 21st Regiment's fight song, 'Rataplan." Mezzo-soprano Cindy Sadler and bass-baritone Stefano de Peppo know their way around occasionally oversize characters, creating well-rounded, memorable ones whether singing or speaking. Sadler's vaporsprone Marquise evolves into a redoubtable matriarch, and de Peppo's Sulpice shifts with ease between a leader of men and the tender father to the orphan Marie.

When the nobility arrives to inspect Marie, they scoff, but the girl wins them over singing "Quand le destin, au milieu" – she will loyally accept her fate. How "charming" she is, they exclaim, and indeed this opera, sung in French with dialogue in English, is about as charming and easy an entrée to the world of opera as you could want. *Vive l'amour! – Robi Polgar*

The National Center for Trans-

gender Equality released the largest transgender survey ever conducted, with 27,715 respondents nationwide. Of those surveyed, 1,490 call Texas home. But the report tells us what we already know: Trans and gender nonconforming folks are disproportionately faced with hardships regarding employment (27% of those who held or applied for a job reported being fired, denied promotion, or not being hired because of their gender identity or expression), housing (30% have experienced homelessness at some point in their lifetime), restrooms (32% admitted to limiting food and drink intake to avoid using public bathrooms in

the past year), police interactions, and more. So what does this survey achieve? "It's next to impossible to fix a problem you can't see," answers Claire **Bow**, an attorney who works with the Transgender Education Network of Texas. She, along with Equality Texas. believes these numbers will help Texans fight back against transphobic bills like Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick's SB 6, known

to most as the bathroom bill. "This survey tells us trans people live in Texas," said Lou Weaver, the transgender programs coordinator at Equality Texas. "Now we have numbers to say we're not making this up."

The signs in Jim Roche's "Some Americans Feel Like This" recall outsider art, though Roche himself is not an outsider artist. He has been making and showing work for a half century or so, including at the Whitney Museum and Venice Biennale. Be that as it

may, his work harnesses the madness and the ephemeral quality that I often associate with outsider art, an untrained riskiness that is willing to go places that most mainstream artists might scoff at, if they deign to notice at all. Roche's focus here is the religious and

political missive, text first gathered from various church marguees and colloquial broadsides, then neatly hand-stenciled by the artist in vibrant, multi-colored fonts. I've made my share of long drives, and typically I come across at least one handmade sign, attached to a barbed wire fence or leaning against a tree, describing, in a rambling and pointed way, how I can avoid damnation, or maligning me toward a particular political perspective. Often the signs, scrawled in dripping black or white paint, are far too long to be read as I drive by at 80 miles an hour, and even if they could, the more verbose ones lose their way into tongues after only a few words. Roche's signs usually make their points clear, but they veer into bonkers territory as well. That's where the fun starts. One example states: "SKATEBOARDERS, VEGETARIANS, ARTIST [sic], SURFERS, MUSICIANS, OCCUPIERS, ACTIVISTS, ADDICTS, FORNICATORS, and PEOPLE WITH TATTOOS are ALL GOING TO HELL! REPENT NOW!" All right, person, I don't believe in hell, though I see what you're getting at. But tattoos? Skateboarders? It's so specific that it makes me wonder if he's talking about someone he knows.

The show covers three large walls dedicated to Hillary Clinton, Jesus, and Donald Trump, respectively, icons upon whom everyone seems to have an opinion. Roche doesn't discriminate. The above sample belongs to the Jesus wall. "MAN SEEKS FEMALE, WHO DOES WHAT SHES TOLD. AND DON'T MIND BEING SLAPPED AROUND IF NEEDED" is among the signs belonging to the Trump wall,

and "HUNGRY ANTS WILL START WAR TO GET DEAD SOLDIERS FOR FOOD. WILL MANKIND FOLLOW THEIR LEAD WHEN THE TIME COMES?" is one of the seven on the Clinton wall. What that particular sentiment has to do with Clinton, I cannot say, but one of the joys of such signage is the yawning gap between the lucid and the crazy. I don't need or want the signs to be easily understood.

I was with the 40,000 or so marching after Inauguration Day. One of the best ways to pass the time during the march (aside from bashfully chanting) was admiring the myriad incredible signs people handmade for the occasion. I noted commentary about the signs at marches nationwide, so many of them accurately, angrily, and humorously addressing the complex and disturbing nature of our current national politics. In Washington, D.C., marchers left their accumulated signs at the Trump Hotel, like a poster-board mic drop. On a more somber note, the gesture also suggests a memorial, the kind where people leave notes and flowers at a space where something tragic has happened. Those mementos typify the ephemerality I mentioned above, something meaningful that is not meant to last. Roche has repurposed political signs, some with ugly messages, into rather beautiful, precisely handled artworks that commemorate and contain them at their wackiest and at their most dangerous. The result is a timely vessel for America's honesty, the type we usually pass on a highway from here to there, and without a second thought. - Sam Anderson-Ramos



SOCCER WATCH BY NICK BARBARO

The U.S. soccer community has come out vocally in opposition to President **Donald Trump's travel ban**, in strong statements from U.S. men's national team captain **Michael Bradley**, the **MLS Players Union**, and, notably, from a number of individual national team players, including **Sacha Kljestan**. His own father fled Yugoslavia, he told *FourFourTwo*, and "came to the U.S. illegally himself and built himself a life here. America is the land of opportunity, and I don't think we're the type of country that should shut our borders to anybody. I think we should welcome everybody here to our soil to live the American dream."



Review: Red Ash Italia

DOWNTOWN HOT SPOT BRINGS BACK THE BASICS

Sometime shortly after Dylan McKay asked his hairdresser at Visible Changes to blowdry his quiff straight up from his forehead, we as a culture decided there was no higher aesthetic goal than being edgy. Since then, we've suffered from halters made from Calvin Klein briefs and Fall Out Boy and an outbreak of graffiti on restaurant walls. Sometimes it works but more times it doesn't, setting a tone that's as rebellious as a Brooks Brothers overcoat. It's probably fair to say that the vast majority of those privileged enough to be eating on a white tablecloth aren't picturing vandalism when they see a remind-

er to "make some trouble." So, it's discomfiting to see that scrawled on the dual story wall of Red Ash Italia, along with a magnified lipstick trace and a lascivious cartoon of Sophia Loren doing her best Amy Winehouse. (Or is it Claudia

Cardinale?) Nothing else about the restaurant – from the otherwise staidly industrial dining room (by architect Jeff Stinnett and interior designer Janet Heinrich) to the hospitality CVs of chef-owner John Carver (who helmed the kitchen at Eddie V's) and partners Larry Foles and Guy Villavaso (the founders of Eddie V's, Wildfish, and Hopdoddy Burger Bar) suggests rocking the boat is a good thing. To be clear, I meant that as a compliment. After 2016's restaurant bloodsport (not to mention the shifting of the geopolitical order), we could all use a little more stability. So what if the entrées coming off of the wood burning grill and oven aren't innovative by any stretch? Familiarity and craft feel like exactly what is needed now. Fussier presentations and flavors may suit times of certainty, but right now we need lemon and garlic. The osso buco Milanese (\$38) may be built in the same way as dozens of online recipes, but the execution – teasing

I'm certainly not accusing Carver of not having a voice, but he is certainly not the type to wedge a sunchoke chip in puree for its architecture.

Simple ingredients star in dishes like the red snapper à la plancha (\$32), resting in a basil slick studded with black olives and sliced garlic, lamb steak (\$26), and pollo alla diavolo (\$24), showing only a little hell-fire with Calabrian chiles. And of course, there are also steaks – luxury steaks of the sort conspicuously bought by those seeking arrangements. But don't let the vulgarity of



rich white men keep you from adding one to your bill. Our rare 16 oz. bone-in filet (\$48) needed no embellishment.

The smaller plates allow for a little more chefly flourish. Burrata is served with a cutting of vine tomatoes (\$15), tender meatballs (\$12) wade in a mascarpone polenta, and the tuna crudo (\$15) unexpectedly adds olive to salmoriglio. But again simplicity yields the most success. The smoke in the shockingly tender grilled octopus (\$15) is reinforced by pancetta braised white beans and humble celery gives the halibut crudo (\$14) most of its brightness. The commitment to integrity of ingredients served the house-made pastas well, too. The wild boar ragu was lusty against pappardelle (\$16 for a small serving), the slight gaminess tempered by shaved Parmiginano-Reggiano. Brown butter sussed out the sweetness from the capelletti's (\$17 small) ricotta filling.

And then there was the glory of the bread (\$2 per person) – a reason alone to visit Red Ash. I'll give it its own paragraph for daring just to be nothing more than garlic bread. I'll admit it didn't quite deliver the initial thrill by a third visit, but the best drugs tend to do that. Those prone to addiction should be advised that the fried, cream-filled donuts are a gateway too. They're described on the menu as coming with blackberry marmelatta and chocolate fonduta, but those are really just fancy names for dipping sauces.

I was a little less blown away with cocktails like the lambrusco-based L'accademia, and maraschino and rum Havana 3am (both \$12), which leaned a little sweet for my taste, but the wine list was comprehensive with affordable options in each category, and the beers on tap were varied enough for any mood.

Drink enough of them and you almost forget about that dang wall. – Brandon Watson



Dear Glutton,

I've got some old friends from the East Coast visiting town this week, and they want to take advantage of the warm weather. What's a great restaurant with a nice patio where I can take them out to dinner? – Fair Weather Friend

Hey there Fair,

The fact that so many Austinites are transplants who moved here from bigger, more expensive cities isn't exactly a secret. Heck, I'm one of 'em. The effects that mass migration has had on the local culture, traffic patterns, and rent prices has been analyzed half to death. But what we don't really talk about is something I think about a lot in my own life: what it's like for those of us who move here, the assumptions that friends from our old lives make about what living in Austin is like.

People from cold climates like to claim we Texans have no seasons, that our winter and summer are just indistinguishable blocks of sprawling heat. They like to picture us, I think, driving around in big pickup trucks with the windows down, spitefully blasting our air conditioners and listening to country music. Somewhere along the line we've developed this cultural idea that people from warm climates are less serious than those of us who have to suffer through long winters, are less culturally productive and intellectually inclined. Think of the Los Angeles scenes in *Annie Hall*. So, before I answer your question, let's just take a beat to get real about what I suspect is the true dynamic at play here. You probably moved to Austin from some cold, bustling eastern city and your friends think you've become a ranch house-living sellout who couldn't hack it in the big leagues. So now they're visiting you, and you want to rub their cold, smug noses in the creature comforts of your life in Austin.

The standard move with out of town visitors is to take them out for barbecue or Tex-Mex, both reliably solid choices, both of which I've done myself and have probably recommended as an approach in past columns. There are many, many places in Austin where you can sit on a patio and eat fried chicken, veggie burgers, and exemplary tacos of all sizes and descriptions. But I suspect that what you want isn't some kind of quick weekend immersion in the version of Austin your visiting friends already think they know. What you want is to prove to them that Austin isn't just some sleepy Texas town, to show them why you moved here in the first place. To show them that we're a vibrant, thriving city, with a vibrant, thriving restaurant culture to match. What you want is a Serious Restaurant that happens to have a beautiful outdoor space where you can soak up the late January sunshine.


So, after taking your friends swimming in Barton Springs, which, come on, is definitely nonnegotiable for any visitor, walk past the Chuy's and the food truck parking lot to Juliet Ristorante, a sophisticated Italian restaurant with an expansive, bamboo-shaded patio and a locally focused, vegetable intensive menu. Sit with your friends in a quiet nook of the covered patio. Get the olive oil tasting and a couple of wood-fired pizzas to share, some small plates of vegetables, and housemade bread. Or hey, you could also order the \$40 steak if you're fancier than me and still feel like you have something to prove. But relax; I bet you they love it here already. Maybe tomorrow you guys can even take a risk, go out somewhere cheap for Lone Star and gueso. There are plenty of great patios to choose from.



Cheap Eats: Whip In

AUSTIN CLASSIC REMAINS ONE OF THE BEST DINING BARGAINS IN TOWN

Fancy food doesn't do much for me. Fine dining is cool, but I want to be fed more than I want to be impressed. It's like the difference between a date being really hip and a date making me laugh. I'd rather laugh. (Wouldn't we all?) Of course, everyone has their own way. Some people love white linen napkins and swirling and sniffing their wine, but I don't need the ceremony. If the food is hot and good, I'm into it. If that sounds like your bag too, Whip In might be just the place to take your special someone – especially if you suspect them of being an anti-snob too, or if you want to test the waters to see just how low-key you can get away with being.

CHEAP EATS CASE FILE 006: WHIP IN

The former gas station is an Austin institution and has long been a hub for beer nerds thirsty for their fat selection of local and international beers on tap, and even bigger selection of wine and beer in the cases. But matriarch Chandan Topiwala's cross-cultural food – an effortless mix of Texas and Indian cuisines – still remains relatively unsung.

The Meal: If there's a better deal out there than Whip In's outrageously inexpensive happy hour, I want to know about it. From 2-6pm every day, you can get two different appetizers for the price of (the more expensive) one. My date and I went for the vegan samosas (\$8) and the Kashmir pepper queso and chips (\$7). The samosas here are unbeatable. Lightly fried and as big as my hand, they're stuffed with spiced mashed potatoes, peas, and raisins, and served with a sweet tamarind date sauce. Spicy cilantro chutney tops the molten queso, creating an unexpected mix of saltiness and sweetness. After both of those dishes, we were both so full that we weren't sure we'd be able to finish the masoor dal (\$9.25). But the creamy melting leeks in red lentil stew, served with a side of fluffy rice and tangy cabbage slaw, were difficult to resist.

The operation is as casual as a backyard barbecue, drawing in a crowd of beer drinkers early in the afternoon. Dining at Whip In feels like a look back into old Austin. They may not have hired an architect to wrap the place in brass and marble, and the lighting may not be arranged for the best Instagram shot, but there's plenty of soul.

The Verdict: I'd return to Whip In any day of the week. The food is simple but inventive, the charming staff is knowledgeable and helpful, and the drinks are dirt cheap. Is there a better way to have a great evening? It's a little bit out of the way for some, and not exactly walkable, but the hustle and bustle of South Congress is a short fiveminute drive away if you want to extend your evening. If you are looking for the biggest bang for your buck, it's difficult to beat this Austin classic. After all, they've had more than 30 years to perfect their formula. - Mary Bryce

Macon Blair Wins Sundance 2017

Grand jury prize-winner tops the list of locals done good – and bad – at Park City

THE BIG WINNER: A NEW AUSTIN INDIE AUTEUR

Film buffs may recognize Macon Blair as an actor from his roles in *Blue Ruin* and *Green Room*, two movies by his friend and longtime collaborator Jeremy Saulnier. But the recent Austin transplant now has a redhot career on the other side of the camera. He was awarded the Sundance Film Festival U.S. Dramatic Competition Grand Jury Prize for his feature film debut, *I Don't Feel* at Home in This World Anymore.

The story follows a nurse (Melanie Lynskey, *Togetherness*) who is just beginning to lose her faith in humanity when her home is robbed. With the help of a manic, rattailed neighbor (Elijah Wood), she sets out on a half-intentional vigilante quest to recover her grandmother's stolen silverware. Blair's shaggy dog storytelling style and sure comedic rhythms are punctuated by shocking, even absurd bursts of violence, a throwback to the Nineties post-Tarantino era of indie film.

During an opening weekend dominated by offscreen frustrations (the presidential inauguration; a Saturday Women's March that snarled filmgoing traffic), Blair's openingnight premiere provided Sundance with a welcome boost of sheer celluloid fun. "They reacted to it as I hoped they would," Blair said in an interview toward the end of the festival. "They laughed at the right parts, and they cringed at the right parts. I have not been able to go to screenings since then, because I want that one to be stuck in my mind."

Readers accustomed to waiting months for buzzy Sundance films to reach a broader audience will be happy to learn that *I Don't Feel at Home in This World Anymore* debuts online later this month as a Netflix Original. Watch it and chill starting Friday, Feb. 24.

THE BIG LOSER: AUSTIN AS A FILM PRODUCTION LOCALE

Though he's lived in Austin going on three years, Blair shot his film in Oregon. "The movie was always going to be set in a fictional, nonspecific, vaguely Southern town," he explains. "I just assumed I would shoot it in Austin, because that's where I live and that would be easiest. But when we broke down the budget, the tax incentives are better in Oregon. It was hard to argue with the math."

Blair's film features the talents of sometime Austinite Wood as well as Lee Eddy, Blair's wife and a longtime fixture of the local theatre scene. Still, there might have been many more opportunities for Austin cast and crew. "When I was writing it, there were a lot of supporting parts that I envisioned local Austin actors playing," Blair admits. "When it shifted, it worked out great, but my hope is to eventually do a movie in Austin, because there are so many great comedians and actors here."

The other Austin filmmaker with a narrative feature at Sundance, UT professor Alex Smith, also shot his film elsewhere, though his was very much a location shoot. *Walking Out*, which Smith wrote and directed with his brother, Andrew, takes place in a rugged, remote mountain range in modern-day Montana. It has drawn comparisons to Ińárritu's *The Revenant* for its wilderness survival storyline, its central father-son relationship, and its reliance on a mama grizzly to pass the first hurdle of the Bechdel test.

Walking Out's core metaphor is poignant and profoundly symmetrical – everything the father teaches on the way up the mountain, the son must put into practice to guide them back down. Introducing the film to a Sundance audience, the Smith brothers put it beautifully and succinctly: "It's about love as a form of survival."



LOSER (RUNNER-UP): CODY WILSON, KING OF THE AUSTIN LIBERTARIAN TECH BROS

The award for most aggravating onscreen personality this Sundance goes to Austin resident Cody Wilson, subject of the documentary *The New Radical*. That's not to say this film should be avoided – on the contrary, it ought to be required viewing for anyone trying to piece together what happened to civil society and radical youth culture over the past half-decade that has landed us in our current Trumpian nightmare.

You've probably heard of Wilson: In 2013, as a UT Law student, he published a CAD file on the internet that would allow anyone who wanted to build a working handgun at home using only a 3-D printer. The State Department forced him to take the file down, and he has since sued the government and is pursuing a Supreme Court hearing on grounds that his right to free speech has been infringed.

Wilson, 28, is every inch the self-hyping millennial start-up entrepreneur, but his businesses are openly corrosive to the common good. He followed up the 3-D gun concept with Dark Wallet, a bitcoin purse explicitly marketed to money launderers and other seedy operators. He's a telegenic salesman who cloaks his might-makes-right libertarianism with the rebellious cool of anti-authoritarianism, palling around with Julian Assange and trafficking pied piper slogans like "I don't believe in rights," and "I don't believe in citizenry." Wilson is an unpleasant Austin cocktail of Rainey Street and Brave New Books, but his documentary portrait can teach us much about politics among the next generation.

WINNER (RUNNER-UP): OTHER TEXAS FILM TOWNS

While no narrative features at Sundance 2017 were filmed in Austin, two exciting entrants in this year's slate were shot elsewhere in the Lone Star State. I Love Dick, an episodic TV series made for Amazon by Transparent showrunner Jill Soloway, will immediately be the smartest thing on TV (-on-the-internet) when it debuts this spring. It was shot in Marfa, where the show is set, and the West Texas town's art legacy is central to the storyline - in particular, the figure of Chinati Foundation founder Donald Judd. Like HBO's Girls, which attempts a similar balance of the two F-words (funny and feminist), and like Enlightened, with a similarly messy, hardto-love female protagonist, the show will attract haters, but it's a revelation.

Meanwhile, Dallas-based auteur David Lowery (Ain't Them Bodies Saints, Pete's Dragon) was back at Sundance with an odd, beautiful creature called A Ghost Story. Reuniting Lowery with Saints stars Casey Affleck and Rooney Mara, the new film was shot in North Texas, but takes place across various planes of existence and time. Affleck stars as a ghost wearing a bedsheet, haunting the house of his ex-lover. If that sounds strange, it is: as strange as life, as strange as love.

• Austin-based director Laura Dunn was back at Sundance with her Wendell Berry doc, now known as *Look & See*. The *Chronicle* spoke with Dunn about the film when it screened at SXSW 2016 – with a slightly different cut – as *The Seer*.

Attention Must Be Paid

The Salesman is a dazzling portrait of a marriage under attack

Iranian writer/director Asghar Farhadi won the Academy Award for Best Foreign Feature for his 2011 film A Separation, and he's been nominated again for his latest film, The Salesman. He won't be attending this year's ceremony, following Donald Trump's recent executive order barring Iranians and citizens of six other predominantly Muslim countries entry into the United States. That the Trump

administration has wasted no time doubling down on the white nationalist politics that powered his campaign should surprise no one. But it might surprise Trump and his follow-

ers, so governed by a fear of "otherness," to discover Farhadi's films are more familiar than they are foreign. Aging parents, blended families, husbands and wives struggling to

THE COMEDIAN

Most people may not remember, but Robert De Niro first appeared in scrappy little comedies directed by novice film director Brian De Palma, audacious late Sixties social satires like Greetings, The Wedding Party, and Hi Mom!. But when the Method Man subsequently channeled Vito Corleone, Travis Bickle, and Jake LaMotta, among others, he became the dramatic actor of his generation, one who obsessively researched his characters, going to great lengths to emulate their physical appearance to the point of near-fanaticism. And then, for a change of pace (or perhaps, a paycheck), he U-turned back to comedy in movies such as Analyze This and those Focker flicks, a wise move for bankability reasons (some of them clicked at the box office) but one that many believe critically diminished his thespic stature, particularly given some of his choices in roles. Recall his performance as the dictator Fearless Leader in the The Adventures of Rocky & Bullwinkle. No doubt, it's something he'd like you to forget.

In The Comedian, De Niro is Jackie Burke, a stand-up insult comic playing gigs at third-rate clubs serving up hecklers and cheap drinks, a past-his-prime entertainer struggling to keep his head above water in a world that refuses

communicate and find affordable housing and choose forgiveness over revenge - these are not just topics of interest in Iran. They're topics of interest for humans, period.

Farhadi's films – which include the 2013 French production The Past, another masterpiece - are slippery to categorize. You could plausibly call them domestic dramas, but their dominoes-falling plotting and tense sus-

pense make them almost thriller-like. With his latest film, Farhadi borrows beats from horror, too; as a front door forebodingly opens, the stomach drops with dread.

That crisis comes later. First, Emad (Hosseini), a high school teacher, and his wife Rana (Alidoosti) must abandon their home after a construction bulldozer compromises the infrastructure of their Tehran apartment building. Suddenly homeless,

to see him as anything else but the blue-collar character he played in a hit Eighties-era sitcom called Eddie's Home. (Fans are constantly calling him Eddie, a mistake he often tries to correct to no avail.) When Eddie, er. Jackie cute-meets the much younger and emotionally unbalanced Harmony (Mann) while performing community service (he sucker-punched an audience member at one of his shows), they strike up an improbable May-December relationship. (Her attraction for him is explained as the result of daddy issues in the form of Harvey Keitel.) The screenplay by stand-up comedian Jeff Ross, best known for hosting those celebrity roasts on Comedy Central, captures at times the pathos of a dimmed star striving to make a living, but does little to explain how a frustrated and sometimes angry Jackie got to where he is today. The character is much like a punch line in search of a joke.

While occasionally engaging, The Comedian isn't very funny. The shock-and-awe humor of insult comedy can be harsh, though De Niro gallantly tries to pull it off without embarrassing himself. A tragically short scene in which Jackie participates in roasting a 95-year-old screen legend (Leachman) achieves a comic tempo that the film's other jesting lacks. They say dying is easy, comedy is hard. It's an observation that applies in more than one way to The Comedian. - Steve Davis **1

they unload their worries at rehearsal, where they're both performing in a production of Arthur Miller's Death of a Salesman (he's playing Willy Lomax, and she's playing his wife). A castmate has a solution - a suddenly empty apartment in the building he manages. Rana sighs with relief: "For once it looks like we're in luck." These are the kind of words that make an attentive viewer flinch. There might as well be a road sign warning "bad things just around the bend."

There are strings attached to this apartment. The past tenant has left all her things behind. Emad is sympathetic - after all, the crappiness of being kicked out of his own home is still fresh for him. The new neighbors shed some light on this past tenant, who had a lot of gentleman callers, the kind that leave cash behind. As Emad and Rana maneuver around her belongings still stacked in the apartment, it's hard to argue:

This past tenant is getting in the way of their present.

And then something terrible happens, which I'm not going to reveal here - only to say that it is a trauma that impacts Emad and Rana both, in different ways. Farhadi prioritizes Emad's experience and his perspective, the injury to his masculinity; I missed Rana's first-person observations in this intensely observational film, which is alert to the background sounds of children playing, a theatre production's backstage action, and the foregrounded nattering of friends and neighbors, whose opinions all color Emad and Rana's processing of this trauma. Still, Rana's voice comes roaring back in the film's held-breath third act. in which these amateur actors return to their old apartment to enact a drama with life-or-death stakes. This final 30 minutes are the film's pièce de résistance.

I AM MICHAEL D: Justin Kelly; with James Franco, Zachary Quinto, Emma Roberts, Charlie Carver, Avan Jogia, Daryl Hannah, Lesley Ann Warren, Jefferson Mays. (NR, 98 min.)

This even-handed biographical film about the transition of Michael Glatze from gay activist to heterosexual Christian pastor is an intentionally provocative work. Taking on the lightning-rod subject of gay conversion, I Am Michael presents its case study without judgment or deep scrutiny, and while there is something to admire in the neutral approach, it ultimately adds up to a flat and colorless film.

Starring James Franco as the real-life Michael Glatze, the film adds fuel to Franco's self-promoted ambiguity over his sexual identity. Opening with a brief scene in which Glatze as a pastor meets with a conflicted teen, the film shifts back 10 years in time to 1998 San Francisco, where Glatze was the managing editor of XY, a magazine for gay male youth, and was living an out-and-proud lifestyle with his boyfriend Bennett (Quinto). An evangelist for gay pride, Glatze regarded that as his life's work, even after he and Bennett move from San Francisco, include a young man named Tyler (Carver) as part of a functioning threesome, and travel the country shooting footage for a documentary about gay youth. It is during this journey that Glatze begins turning to the word of God and fruitlessly

tries to reconcile his homosexuality with his growing Christian faith. After a dalliance with Buddhism, his fear of death and a series of panic attacks provide the final push he needs to answer God's call. Eventually enrolling in Bible school, he finds a girlfriend (Roberts) and goes on to become the religious leader

of his own church. The movie ends with a hint of the possible return of his panic attacks.

Based on the magazine article "My Ex-Gay Friend," written by Glatze's XY colleague Benoit Denizet-Lewis, *I Am Michael* was scripted by Stacey Miller and Justin Kelly, who also directed. The material was suggested to Kelly by executive producer Gus Van Sant, and is Kelly's debut feature (which is being released after his second feature, *King Cobra*). Too much of the film is told via Glatze's voiceover rather than shown through interactions with other characters.

An overbearing music score by Tim Kvasnosky and Jake Shears also weighs down the narrative. The performances are uniformly good and Kelly's effort to tell an unbiased story is admirable, but *I Am Michael* ultimately delivers more in the way of talking points than drama. *** - *Marjorie Baumgarten*

O I AM NOT YOUR NEGRO D: Raoul Peck. (PG-13, 95 min.)

When the great author, essayist, and public intellectual James Baldwin died in 1987, he left behind 30 pages of an unfinished manuscript that was to be titled *Remember This House*. The book was to be a personal account of the assassinations of his friends Medgar Evers, Malcolm X, and Martin Luther King Jr., which occurred over the course of five years (1963-68). As Baldwin wrote to his literary agent in his book proposal, he wanted "these three lives to bang against and reveal each other, as in truth they did, and use their dreadful journey as a means of instructing the people whom they loved so much, who betrayed them, and for whom they gave their lives." Now, 30 years after Baldwin's death, Raoul Peck, the Haitian filmmaker of features and documentaries, has brought *Remember This House* to more-than-satisfactory fruition with the film *I Am Not Your Negro*. The film uses the words of Baldwin's manuscript (narrated by screen great Samuel L. Jackson in his natural voice, copying neither Baldwin's lyrical cadences nor the fiery oratorical delivery for which the actor has become wellknown) to explore the genesis and depths of America's so-called "Negro problem."

Peck blends an array of historical and contemporary footage, film and television clips, still photographs, written words onscreen, and music with Baldwin's words to excavate the roots of America's self-perpetuating fantasy of itself. Baldwin's language, always greatly admired by other writers, still comes through with its pinpoint precision, mellifluous rhythm, and stirring undertow. An avid watcher of movies, Baldwin cites many examples of the complexity of screen identity, which are supported by Peck with film clips that delve deeply into the images of such figures as John Wayne, Doris Day, Harry Belafonte, and Sidney Poitier, among others. Peck also employs a great deal of historical material from the Sixties, which document the marches, riots, and political movements of the era, as well as the commonalities and differences among the three murdered leaders who are the intrinsic

subject of this study. Baldwin calls out his country's "moral apathy," and how it is the responsibility of witnesses to get the story out. Peck enhances the archival material with fresh images of the racial offenses shoved into public light by the recent Black Lives Matter movement, which, despite lending *I Am Not Your Negro* a contemporaneous context, also permanently fixes the film in time (perhaps to its long-term detriment).

Ideas and their visual illustrations come at the viewer in a cascading torrent. The editing by Alexandra Strauss deserves its own recognition for its painstaking exactness. Never a Black Muslim or Christian, a member of NAACP or the Black Power movement, Baldwin had an acuteness of vision that was distinctly his own and never the party line. He is a writer whose work belongs on every bookshelf in America, and now with *I Am Not Your Negro* his words can be heard, too, on every movie screen in the land. This new essay might also be titled *Even More Notes of a Native Son*.

RESIDENT EVIL: THE FINAL CHAPTER D: Paul W.S. Anderson; with Milla Jovovich, Iain Glen, Ali Larter, Shawn Roberts, Ruby Rose, Rola, Ever Anderson. (R, 106 min.)

Alas, there is not much I can tell you about this ultimate entry in the video-game movie franchise Resident Evil. I apologize. It is rare that a film has flummoxed me so. Being familiar with the movies, and having played a handful of the video games, I thought I'd be prepared to walk into this film with at least a modicum of understanding of the world, the motives of its characters, and, of course, those zombie Dobermans. I guess I shouldn't be surprised that the film is an incoherent mess; I had naively assumed that a film declaring itself as "The Final Chapter" would have the courtesy to wrap up the narrative nice and tight. But that doesn't seem to be director Paul W.S. Anderson's intent, as is his way. The writer on all six of the films, and the director of most, Anderson, along with partner and star Milla Jovovich, have given the dwindling fans of the series a limp and lifeless simulacrum of what a Resident Evil movie looks like.

And this is what it looks like: Alice (Jovovich) in a postapocalyptic wasteland, hooking up with a ragtag group of survivors whose names you may recall because you played the games. If the terms T-virus and Raccoon City ring a

bell, well, you're halfway there, as Alice must travel to the latter to find the last known antidote of the former to stop the extinction of the human race. Attempting to thwart her efforts is Dr. Isaacs (Glen), who happens to have a clone roaming around the wasteland gathering an army, but these things happen sometimes. There's also an Al. known as the Red Queen (Ever Anderson), who was once evil, but decides to help Alice in her quest, because it probably seemed like a good reversal at the time. With 48 hours to find the cure, the film is given an annoying deadline that, in a bold movie, actually ratchets down the tension. Which is a shame, because Jovovich is a badass action hero. But here, she (and the film) are at the mercy of editor Doobie White. whose work in assembling a cohesive film by stitching together a succession of shots, each no longer than seven seconds, does the film no favors (the predominant color palette of air-vent silver doesn't help, either). The film is drab and epileptic. Resident Evil: The Final *Chapter* purports to be the last in this dying franchise, but when the bad guy has a line at the end about his work "not being over yet," I can't help but be fearful about what the future may hold.

A struggling single mother in Santa Barbara circa 1979, Dorothea (Bening) enlists others to chip in with the molding and moral education of her son Jamie (Zumann). including her twentysomething boarder Abbie (Gerwig), who turns him on to feminism and punk music: another boarder, William (Crudup), a hippie carpenter; and Jamie's best friend Julie (Fanning), who is diving headlong into the sexual revolution but keeps the besotted Jamie at arm's length. That's a lot of 20th century culture clash stuffed under one roof, though clash is too emphatic a word: more like gentle friction. Mike Mills is an uncommonly empathetic filmmaker, and his autobiographically close movie is delightful - funny and dreamy and sometimes desperately sad. A DOG'S PURPOSE

Whatever has led Hallström down this slippery slope to syrupy exploitation – which began, of course, with the gateway drug of a couple of Nicholas Sparks adaptations, blended with 2009's *Hachi: A Dog*'s *Tale* – he has created a misguided and utterly tone-deaf Hallmark card to the canis lupus familiaris and the people who love them. THE FOUNDER

A fictionalized origin story about the birth of a myth (note the singular of the title), The Founder begins in 1954, when door-to-door salesman Ray Kroc (Keaton) spies his next entrepreneurial opportunity at a burger stand run by the McDonald brothers, Mac (Lynch) and Dick (Offerman). Convinced of the restaurant's franchise potential, Kroc wins the reluctant brothers over with a rousing pitch: "Do it for your country. McDonald's can be the new American church." It's a chilling moment - pause to consider national obesity rates - and one of the few overt instances in which Robert Siegel's script encourages the viewer to connect the dots between these historical events depicted and the fast-food chain's now-ubiquity. Mostly Siegel and director John Lee Hancock (The Blind Side) stick to a "and-then-this-happened" account of how Kroc savvily expanded the brand and edged the original McDonald brothers out of the business. Robert Elswit's cinematography is lovely, and McConaughev is a hoot to watch, but we are never sure whether Wells is meant to be seen as a self-deluded boob chasing get-rich-quick schemes or a just-smart-enough oddball chasing the American dream. Delightful, informative, and engaging is this story about the black women mathematicians whose work helped NASA launch the first manned vessels into orbit. Taraii P. Henson, Octavia Spencer, and Janelle Monáe portrav the three women at the core of the story, and each actress creates a captivating character. As the math prodigv Katherine Johnson, Henson plays both nerdy and feisty; Monáe is Mary Jackson, whose ambitions are stymied by her race, sex, and beauty; and Spencer is the computers' supervisor Dorothy Vaughan, who creates her own path to advancement by realizing the potential of the new IBM mainframe. While Hidden Figures is likable and illuminating, it is, nevertheless, routine and predictable. Competent and heartwarming, director Theodore Melfi's technique seems better suited to the TV-movie-of-the-week format than big-screen storytelling. JULIETA

The generous folds in a billowy crimson dress undulate like a beating heart in the virtuoso opening shot of Julieta. Spanish auteur Pedro Almodóvar's mournful adaptation of three short stories written by Nobel Prize winner Alice Munro, each focusing on a woman at different times in her life. Almodóvar's seamless screenplay transposes Munro's Canadian setting to his native country, and expands upon her Chekhovian narratives by linking them thematically through elements of grief, guilt, and loss. Straightforward and yet emotionally complex, the film is Almodóvar's most sobering work to date, a mystery about a daughter's abandonment of her mother without explanation. Back in the heyday of the Hollywood studio, Julieta would have qualified as a "woman's picture," a female-centric melodrama with weepy overtones. "Transportive" is a word critics like to throw around in a generalized sense, but with La La Land that transportiveness has a very specific destination, for me at least. If only Passengers didn't try to reverse course back toward romance, a ship already sailed. Were this a modest little art film, that morally murky path might be applauded as subversive. To continue the thought experiment, the same film with gender-reversed roles is a tantalizing what-if. Named for the holiday on which the events took place, Patriots Day recounts the horrific bombings at the 2013 Boston Marathon, the dramatic manhunt to find the culprits over the next few days, and the immediate and ongoing aftermath that forever changed the lives of the victims. Mark Wahlberg plays Tommy Saunders, a fictional composite of Boston's first responders whom the film places at every key event in the narrative. Even though the Boston native makes for a suitable figure to represent the Boston Everyman, the character's Waldo-like appearances give the film a fabricated feel, which run counter to its clear desire to channel authenticity. Overall, there's a disjointed feel to the proceedings as the fictional Saunders is inserted into this factual narrative. The film ends with David "Big Papi" Ortiz and his heartfelt shout-out to the Boston Strong mystique when he spoke before the first Red Sox game after the tragedy. 
SILENCE

Set in 17th century Japan, the film takes place during the feudal shogunate era when Western influences and religions were outlawed on the islands and Catholic missionaries were banished or tortured to death if they refused to renounce their religion. To this foreign land come two Portuguese Jesuits, Fathers Rodrigues (Garfield) and Garrpe (Driver), in a martyr's quest to find their former mentor, Father Ferreira (Neeson), who has disappeared amid the mass exterminations. Following The Last Temptation of Christ and Kundun, this is Scorsese's third go at strictly spiritual subject matter, and it is his most concentrated and engaging of the bunch. A certain element of the drama gives off the timeless odor of white men functioning in a heathen quagmire, the oft-repeated myopic perspective of the Western civilizers. Whether in karaoke bars, television singing competitions, or uploaded YouTube videos, it seems that no one these days can refrain from bursting into song. And what's good for human beings turns out to be good, too, for the bipedal, talking (and trilling) animals that populate the world of Sing, the latest animated movie from Illumination Entertainment (Despicable Me, The Secret Life of Pets). Matthew McConaughey stars in a mostly non-singing role as a koala named Buster Moon, who stages a vocal contest as a last-ditch attempt to save his old theatre from foreclosure. The plot is pretty bare-bones, moving from one song-and-dance interlude to the next. Some cute visual gags, such as a snail singing its heart out while balanced atop a microphone, bring smiles. Directors Garth Jennings (Son of Rambow) and Christophe Lourdelet have fashioned a pretty sweet movie, despite dousing it with overkill. The effect is "a little pitchy, dawg." (12/23/2016)

SLEEPLESS

Something got lost in translation between the dandy French thriller Sleepless Night from 2011 and this generic American remake. Jamie Foxx is the story's central character Vincent Downs, a Las Vegas detective on the trail of a drug syndicate. While driving his son Thomas (Johnson) to football practice, the teen is kidnapped and held for ransom by drug dealer and casino owner Stanley Rubino (Mulroney), who in turn owes drugs to the Novak crime family, represented by its nasty No. 1 son (McNairy, who is quite effectively sinister). The bulk of the film takes place within the casino during an all-night cat-andmouse chase. A couple of set-pieces that take place on a crowded dance floor and in a spa pool are well-executed, and the film also has its share of shattered casino glass shots and car crashes. But the 95 minutes it takes for this sleepless night to unfold onscreen feel tedious rather than breathless. (01/20/2017) Mariorie Baumgarten **

With this second pairing with horror revitalizers Blumhouse Productions, writer/director M. Night Shyamalan seems to have recovered some of his former mojo. Using minimal locations and few characters, Split relies on James McAvoy's central performance and Michael Gioulakis' expressive cinematography to tell its story about a man with dissociative identity disorder (DID), the three girls he abducts, and the therapist who tries to help him. Give McAvoy an award (or 24) for his performance; the Scottish actor adopts so many different behaviors and speech patterns that it's impossible not to marvel at his versatility. Shyamalan (The Sixth Sense) also includes one of his signature surprise endings, although this one is something more like an in-joke than a shocker. The film's third act is somewhat wanting in tension and high-stakes emotions as the characters go through their

paces. Still, as far as cinema's long love affair with DID dramas goes, Split ain't a half-bad contribution. (01/20/2017)

XXX: RETURN OF XANDER CAGE

Daredevil government operative Xander Cage is the millennial generation's answer to James Bond. Trading in 007's classic tuxedo and dry martini for a tank top and a shot of adrenaline, the tatted-up muscleman who beds every scantily clad babe (or more) he meets never breaks a sweat even when skiing down a lush jungle mountainside or freefalling without a parachute. In this so-so sequel resurrecting the extreme sports athlete turned NSA agent, the suits once again enlist a reluctant Cage (Diesel) for a mission, this time to retrieve a stolen doomsday device called Pandora's Box. (A depressingly miscast Collette oversees the operation.) The stunt work is the best thing going here, just as in the first film of the franchise in which Diesel originated the role of X back in 2002. His subdued energy rarely commands the screen; you're often looking at him only because that's where director Caruso points the camera. (01/27/2017)

Le Quattro Volte (2010) ITALY

An aged goatherd dies, and a goat is born. Although this Italian film has no dialogue or music, Le Quattro Volte is an aurally rich movie. The essence of this austere, funny, beautiful, and transfixing meditation on the cycle of life is the regenerative continuity from man to goat to tree to mineral. (And one stunningly composed, comical sequence earned the dog that sets off a chain of events a special award when the film premiered at Cannes.) - Marjorie Baumgarten

The NeverEnding Story (1984) SCIENCE FICTION ORIENTED

Is this movie even any good? I haven't seen it since I was a kid, but back then I was fully in thrall to its magic and melancholy and defining idea that an active imagination can literally save the world; it's no stretch to say I fell in love with storytelling and existential despair both because of The NeverEnding Story. (Sartre would come later; first I cut my teeth on the Nothing.) But to circle back to the original guestion: This movie stars a flying dog - sorry, luckdragon - and a prophetic turtle, a self-sacrificing horse and a homicidal wolf. Plus sentient rocks! Fuck yeah, this movie is awesome.

Phenomena (1985) HORROR AND FANTASTIC

An entomophobic's worst nightmare, Argento's last truly supernatural film from his classic period carries plenty of creepy-crawl resonance to the director's past masterworks while embarking on its own hauntingly bizarro themes. Strikingly young Jennifer Connelly is trapped at a hoity-toity Swiss boarding school as she assists wheelchair-bound Donald Pleasence in uncovering a series of brutal murders. The kicker? Connelly has a psychic link to the insect kingdom. Argento choreographs disturbing setpieces of houseflies, arachnids, maggots, and presumably cooties, while the scarlet spurts aplenty and the ever-lunatic Pleasence hangs out with his best friend, a chimpanzee. - Marc Savlov

White God (2014) HUNGARY

This amazing feat of cinema blends political allegory with the tropes of coming-of-age films, as a girl is separated from her dog, and roams the city of Prague trying to find her. Eschewing CGI, director Kornél Mundruczó coaxes performances from, in some sequences, 280 dogs. The final scenes evoke a kind of Battleship Potemkin of canine mutiny. - Josh Kupecki



Sound Policy?

While **City Council** approved a pilot program testing out later music curfews for **Red River**'s outside stages last week, new restrictions have come to light that could potentially impose earlier-than-normal cutoff times for outdoor music venues during **South by Southwest**, the most profitable 10 days of the year for Austin clubs.

'Tis the season for another permitting controversy.

Last February, event producers blew gaskets when Austin Center for Events (ACE) stopped accepting temporary event applications before the stated calendar deadline. Exactly 52 weeks later, venue operators are sweating a widely circulated email from ACE saying they've approved new sound cessation times for Outdoor Music Venues (OMV) applying for extended hour permits: 1am, Sun.-Wed, and 1:30am, Thu.-Sat. Usually, clubs are able to host open-air music until 2am from the second Friday to the third Sunday of March. The restriction would amount to seven and a half less hours of programming for venues including Mohawk, Stubb's, and Cheer Up Charlies.

"It's turned into a new beginning," says Josh Logan of Chief White Lightning, the side project now eclipsing his decade-old Austin trio the Blind Pets. The singer/guitarist inked a deal with L.A. indie label El Camino Media, home to Veruca Salt and Skating Polly, for this summer's CWL debut LP Donut Feel Good, which marks a notable departure from the nutsack-swinging rock & roll of the Blind Pets with a collision of Kinks and Mikal Cronin. The album, composed and arranged by Midnight Stroll instrumentalist Jonas Wilson, was recorded in Portland, Ore., last year with Battleme's Matt Drenik, formerly of Austin band Lions.

"It was literally a culmination of my 12 years in Austin," says Logan.

Last month, the frontman left Austin for Long Beach, where he's managing a music venue called **Millworks**. Connections to the Blind Pets and Austin remain, but he couldn't turn down opportunities sprouting out west.

"These days I'm believing that impossible is possible," he smiles. Mohawk GM **Cody Cowan** says each hour during **SXSW** represents several thousand dollars in bar sales for his business. An earlier curfew would also throw his venue's curating into chaos – affecting contracts that have been signed since September. "There are negative

economic consequences all around for it," says Cowan, noting that SXSW accounts for approximately one-third of his venture's annual earnings. **SXSW Managing Director Roland Swenson** is keeping close tabs on the situation.

"We have 17 venues that might be affected during SXSW, but this has a much broader impact than just SXSW, as it reaches throughout an already struggling downtown Austin music venue landscape," Swenson explained via email. "We're waiting like everyone else to hear what their final decision will be. It's my understanding that there has been a lot of push-back from the venues. And we've already scheduled quite a few shows ending at 2am at the affected venues." Alejandra Lopez, deputy director of the city's Economic

Development Department (EDD), says earlier cutoff times are "not set in stone" and that they were born of safety concerns from the **Austin Police Department**. APD and the EDD's Music & Entertainment Division are both part of the interdepartmental ACE team, which oversees the planning of special events.

"I can tell you what APD told me: that it's about crowd control, line queuing, and traffic," says Lopez. "If all shows end up going late, then let out at the same time. They're concerned about how orderly that will happen, whether there's street closures or not."

Like last February's permitting blowup, guelled when ACE decided to accept additional

applications, the city already appears to be walking back curfew limitations. Lopez doubts there will be across-the-board implementation of earlier cutoff times, but extended hours permits will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. ACE added a questionnaire to OMV applications, inquiring whether anything has changed in how they operate the rest of the year in terms of sound, line queuing, security, commercial loading areas, and emergency exits. She says that information will be shared with APD, Transportation, and other ACE departments. That group will collectively decide if there are any concerns needing to be dealt with, including the possibility of an early curfew.

"We're ultimately the ones who say yes to extended hours, but we're hearing what our APD and other departments' concerns are," concluded Lopez.

Raam calls music a "universal language" that unites people and views Austin's annual March madness as a celebration of diversity and inclusion: "SXSW is what America really is and should aspire to be like."

It's currently unclear if travel plans for Libyan women's rights advocate **Dr. Alaa Murabit**, booked to speak at SXSW, will be impacted. The Festival regularly hosts participants from the banned country list, notably Syrian techno vocalist **Omar Souleyman**, who warmed hearts at SXSW 2013 with a concert raising funds for the **Syrian Red Cross**.

President's Immigration Ban Problematic for SXSW

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Donald Trump's immigration ban doesn't sit well with South by Southwest organizers, who said they were "alarmed" about an executive order suspending admission into the U.S. from Iraq, Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, and Yemen for 120 days.

"We stand against discriminatory laws and unequivocally support civil rights for all persons everywhere," read a statement from the Festival. "Participation by speakers, artists, and filmmakers from around the world is crucial to the creative mix of ideas that makes our event meaningful." Iranian art-rock vocalist **King Raam** is being forced to cancel his appearance at SXSW.

"I am terrified to come to the USA to be detained and ridiculed at the border," says the dual Iranian/Canadian citizen who's toured America several times. "Since our country is on that wonderful list, our lawyer advised us against making any attempts to enter the U.S. as he fears that we will be rejected at the border under this new rule."

HALF NOTES

TWO NICE GIRLS guitarist Laurie Freelove, 60, died in Kyle on Jan. 22 according to a funeral home notice posted by her family. The seminal, openly queer Austin pop trio of Freelove, Gretchen Phillips, and Kathy Korniloff operated 1986–92, though Freelove left to pursue a solo career in '89 and was replaced by Meg Hentges. After IBM moved her family through Europe and the Middle East during her childhood, she received a degree in art at the University




of Maryland before moving to Austin in 1980. Record contracts for both TNG and her own solo career transpired through SXSW. "It amazes me how Two Nice Girls has opened doors for me," she reflected to the *Chronicle* in 1997. "I had quit after the first album was made, but it made a lot of money and had a very huge touring audience, and industry people know the success of that."

MAYOR STEVE ADLER endorsed virtual tip-bucket app **TipCow** during Saturday's **State of the City** speech, commending it as a marriage of two of Austin's strengths: tech and music. TipCow CEO **Chris Bush** says Adler's public backing resulted in a quick 86 app installs, 34 fan sign-ups, and five artist sign-ups – though he noted that you can use the app to tip bands without having an account.

SHAKEY GRAVES RELEASES his full discography, including demos, rarities, B-sides, and live cuts, on **Bandcamp** Feb. 9-11, downloadable at a price of your choosing. To help counteract "our new president's disgusting vision of America," the homegrown troubadour will donate half the sales to a good cause suggested by fans at potentialnudity@shakeygraves.com. Next Thursday, Graves storms **Mohawk** for a song swap with **David Ramirez** and **Rayland Baxter** – promising "fart jokes, storytelling, and kumbaya" – then plays a full set with his band. Tickets (\$10) are selected lottery style, ending Friday at noon.

riginally trained as a classical pianist, Jack DeJohnette, 74, instead became a certified jazz legend on drums. Playing with John Coltrane and working with his native Chicago's pioneering Association for the Advancement of Creative Musicians, he moved to New York in 1966 to work with Charles Lloyd and ended up leading the percussive corps on Miles Davis' landmark fusion records Bitches Brew, Jack Johnson, and On the Corner. Mind-boggling collaborations followed: Sonny Rollins, Ornette Coleman, Herbie Hancock, Keith Jarrett, Bill Evans, Pat Metheny, Freddie Hubbard, Stan Getz, etc., ad infinitum.

Ranging from free jazz to New Age which net his only Grammy on 2008's Peace *Time* – to avant funk, his solo artistry began with 1969's DeJohnette Complex and now encompasses nearly 40 albums across a half-century. Recorded for Germany's ECM Records, with whom the drummer has a relationship stretching back four decades, latest release In Movement pairs the bandleader alongside the scions of two old friends: saxophonist Ravi Coltrane, and bassist/electronicist Matthew Garrison, son of John Coltrane's longtime bassist Jimmy Garrison. Alternating languid melodies with vibrant group improvisations, the trio swings and soars through a program that includes songs from Ravi's father and Earth, Wind & Fire, alongside originals.

A 2012 National Endowment for the Arts Jazz Master, DeJohnette spoke by phone from his home in New York's Hudson River Valley on the occasion of his first Austin date since gigs with Miles Davis at the Armadillo World Headquarters back in the Seventies.

Austin Chronicle: You've known Ravi and Matthew since they were children. You first played with them 20 years ago, and the trio's now been a working band for a few years. What's it like working with guys you've known since before they could play?

Jack DeJohnette: It feels great! They're taking care of business, and that's why I'm playing with them. They come from a lineage; I played with their parents, so that continues in present day. Matthew is like my godson. He lived with me for a number of years. Ravi's really close, like another family member. Musically, personally, spiritually, and worldview-wise, we're on similar wavelengths. So the idea of us coming together was a natural one and it's grown that way ever since.

AC: Matthew employs electronics, which you've experimented with over the years. How easy or difficult is it to incorporate synthetic sounds into organic music that depends on live improvisation?

JD: Well, electronics is the same. Matthew uses it with an organic soundscape, like a palette. So it fits right in. The juxtaposition of the electronic and acoustic, and the way we hear it, inspires Ravi and I to play different things. So it's really a great tool. People think there's no chord structure for some of the stuff we do, but actually there is, and Matthew takes care of that. Also, Ravi's

playing scales and chords, and I'm working off the same thing. I also play piano in the trio as well. It's all that stuff. We trust Matthew to come up with creative ideas when he does it. He's composing with the electronics in the moment. It's not pre-setup. There are some things, but a lot of it he's doing in real time. He's improvising on the spot with the electronics as well as the electric bass.

AC: There's a lot of tributes on In Movement, a Miles Davis tune, a John Coltrane song, an Earth, Wind & Fire cover. Plus, you dedicated some songs to other musicians. "Two Jimmys" refers to Jimmy Garrison and Jimi Hendrix. What connects those two for you? **JD**: They were important legends – Jimmy on the bass and Jimi on guitar. Hendrix I didn't have a chance to play with, but I did [with] Jimmy Garrison. He was incredible, just an incredible musician. He created a style of playing the bass that's still recognized and respected to this day. I thought it was great to put those two together, one

And Matthew, since he plays the electric [bass], there's an extension. He's got the influences: his father's influence, and Hendrix, with the electronics. Pretty obvious to me [chuckles]. *AC*: You've had a long association with ECM, and then of course there's your long tenure with the label in the Keith Jarrett and Gary Peacock "standards" band. What makes ECM the label you keep coming back to?

JD: Well, the quality of it. And the variety of music that Manfred [Eicher] records. It's an eclectic label. It's not just one type of music. Manfred likes all kinds of music, all genres, and all he's looking for is the quality and dedication and the creative sincerity of the artist. So he's made quite a reputation. The label has great sound and great album covers. In this day and age, it's an independent label that's got quite a track record. He brings the best out of the artist. We have a long – over 30 years – artistic relationship, which continues today.

AC: You're turning 75, but you're not slowing down. Unlike rock musicians, where people your age are often considered well past their prime, jazz musicians are not only expected to still be at the top of their game, but progressing. Why do you think that's the case with jazz and classical music as opposed to pop and rock?

JD: Well, you're just as relevant as your productivity is. There are a lot of elder musicians who are still quite productive: Henry Threadgill, Muhal Richard Abrams, Dave Holland, Roy Haynes, who's in his 90s, Ron Carter, who's 79, Andrew Cyrille, 77, Carla Bley, who's 80, Cecil Taylor. Still producing, still relevant, still energetic – so why not? [laughs]

AC: In your long and diverse career, what have you not done yet that you'd still like to do?

JD: Oh, I don't know – I'm just enjoying what I'm doing. Continue doing that, working with new people, composing music. I think people need music more than ever now, and need to hear vibrant music to feed their souls, and try and balance these frenetic energies that are roaming the planet. That's what I really want to do, see music become a force for good. Not only playing music, but working music in the healing arts as well – music therapy and things like that. That's what I'd like to continue doing. *AC:* You've worked with so many music giants. Who was your favorite? What was the most memorable gig?

JD: There's no one person. All those people that I've worked with, they've given me so much. People in Chicago like Eddie Harris, Herbie Hancock, Miles, Charles Lloyd, Coltrane, Benny Carter – the list goes on. Sonny Rollins, Freddie Hubbard, McCoy Tyner. I feel blessed with so many people. I can't just tell you one person.

AC: Do you feel like one of the giants yourself? **JD:** I'm honored to be looked at in the legacy of all the great masters and pioneers to have contributed to the music. To be mentioned in that league of players is indeed an honor, and I'm eternally grateful for that. ■

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LEOPOLD & HIS FICTION **Darling Destroyer** (Native Fiction)

Modern rock's flaccid riffs haven't gentrified Leopold & His Fiction. Not given the genuine excitement of fourth album Darling Destroyer. Aided by local super producer Chris "Frenchie' Smith, the Austin outfit fleshes out its sonic palette without sacrificing brash, guitar-driven fury. Singer/guitarist and namesake Daniel Leopold understands that rock & roll remains a dish best served dramatic, so the Detroit native augments the 12-bar blues strut of opener "Cowboy" with a glam rock sheen owing as much to Marc Bolan as



Jack White. "My heart is made of stone/ I'm alive when I'm alone." snarls Leopold on the swaggering "It's How I Feel (Free)," playing the part of his chosen genre's lonesome traveler with gusto. The Motor City maestro's affinity for Motown coats the swinging "I'm Caving In" and sultry "Better Off Alone," the latter juxtaposing gospel-tinged harmonies with seductive, minor key chord changes. Languid slide guitars soar on folker "Ride," while "Who Am I" strips away Leopold's mighty Fiction in lieu of acoustic strums and a plaintive vocal melody. Sounds of a bygone era underlie the LP's raucous second half in "Saturday," echoing Elton John's weekend anthem, and the piano interlude on "Boy" hearkening the Beatles' "Lady Madonna." Leopold & His Fiction scatters such sonic Easter eggs throughout the diverse and electrifying Darling Destroyer, proving they're informed by the past, not resigned to it. **** – Bryan Rolli

WHITNEY ROSE South Texas Suite (Six Shooter)

Native Canadian Whitney Rose has really taken to Texas. The local's full-length

Now six-song rejoinder South Texas Suite, cut at Dale Watson's Ameripolitan Studios, continues the love affair both in subject matter and music. While she grew up in Georgia and began making her musical mark in California. Barbara Nesbitt became a known entity locally and beyond as half of country rockin' Whiskey Sisters. Nesbitt released her third solo album Almost Home in 2013, a subdued singer-songwriter reflection of where she was before the Sisters started their Austin rumble. When Teal Collins returned to Marin County two years later, the remaining Sister's discography remained quiet until the release of Right as Rain. The new disc finds Nesbitt making accom-

plished contemporary country, music with smarts and attitude, a faultless demonstration of her clear soprano that falls somewhere between the sweetness of Suzy Bogguss and the whiskey tinge of local Sunny Sweeney. The disc features some of Nesbitt's best songwriting, a mix of bluegrass ("Hot Tin Roof"), honky-tonk ("Someone I Can't Live Without"), and plainspoken sexuality ("I Brought My Pajamas, Let's Get Drunk"), all from the heart and with a knowing wink toward tradition.

half-century-plus career. Delbert McClinton has impacted nearly every genre he's touched, from honky-tonk and country to the roots of rock and pop and soulful R&B. The Lubbockborn/Ft. Worth-reared belter even extends an indelible influence into the realm of blues harp. At 76, he now plies a jazzier note while retaining his trademark fire and grit. "Don't Do It" bursts at the outset, bluesy and swanky with help from Lou Ann Barton and Jimmie Vaughan, but "Doin' What You Do" and "Middle of Nowhere" roll easier rhythms, the latter titling a high falsetto from McClinton's still flush vox. Centerpieces "San Miguel" and "Pulling the Strings" pluck atmospheric tones alongside "Like Lovin' Used to Be" and "Jones for You," the singer's scratchy croon striking somewhere between Jimmy Durante and Randy Newman. "Neva" kicks up a funkier groove. Delbert McClinton tears up the blues circuit, but the easy saturation of Prick of the Litter serves up its own satisfaction. – Doug Freeman ****

HARD PROOF Stinger (Modern Outsider)

Afrobeat promulgators Hard Proof began life studying Fela Kuti, but Stinger moves the home-

grown 10-piece into another sphere. While the driving horns and rhythms remain central to what the decade-old group represents, nine instrumentals here platform the group's most fully realized ideas and execution. With scorching guitar solos and swirling keyboards offsetting intense polyrhythms, Stinger comes as close to capturing their exuberant, at times fierce live show. The title track leads back to their roots, a rolling tide of African sweeps led by the horns swinging in unison. In Austin, only Grupo Fantasma, their offshoot Brownout, and El Tule match Hard Proof when it comes to crackling energy. Selections like the appropriately titled "Incendiary" and slinky guitar funk of "Boss" cue up prime examples of an even more inventive, cohesive ensemble. – Jim Caligiuri ***

MALIK The Awakening (II)

No such thing as a sure thing, but 20-year-old Brian Baptiste has pitched his trajectory upward as Malik on these wellpurposed chronicles of a young soul teetering in the balance. Continuing the Austin



rapper/producer's existentialist series, The Awakening (II) follows his ultimately hopeful The Principium with a sonically dense spiritual reverie turned burner. Oozing confidence, this

spectacular offering is rife with trap, jazz, and trip-hop cadences, its production lush throughout. On lead single "Alone," he tickles the keys and goes full-on PBR&B singsong over layered flourishes. The album's best track goes to atmospheric stalker "S.M.S.," where he calls out rap's spiritually bereft subculture: "The secret's minimal, keep it subliminal/ No one's born a criminal, but we can get him there." On "Something / Nothing" and "Exodus," he makes use of eerie touches and strange clangs à la Brixton's old trip-hop/ electronic acts. Malik eschews preachiness, not necessarily even delivering a Christian message - which is the trick.

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TRÈS OUI Singles Going Nowhere (Austin Town Hall/Square of **Opposition**) Eight seconds into

the bass/drum combo opening of "Fall Back,"

Singles Going Nowhere cements its aesthetic by careening into iridescent pop territory. Five songs clocking in at 17 minutes, the debut EP from Austin fivepiece Très Oui comes across as lyrically abstract aside from "Prince of Pop," a love song for Prefab Sprout courtesy of frontman and guitarist Nathaniel Cardaci, whose Eighties power-pop vocal affectation matches a musical effort focused on building a cohesive sonic luster. Ian Jensen's synth-y sheen and ethereal vocals lent by Hannah Read steer Très Oui closer to dream-pop, but it's all rooted firmly in jangly, buoyant guitars and Seth Whaland's chugging basslines. The disc's greatest strength lives in its unusual compositions and the group's innate awareness of when to let things breathe, like when the denouement of slower cut "Twin Peaks" unexpectedly rears back into an astral, instrumental clamor. ****

DALE WATSON & RAY BENSON Dale & Ray (Ameripolitan/Home)

There are no bigger showmen in Texas country than Ray Benson and Dale Watson, the ringleader of Western swing's pre-eminent outfit Asleep at the Wheel and the Lone Star-pluggin', Chicken Shit Bingo balladeer, respectively. The challenge of their combining forces for a duet album is a risk of sheer personality - that each will be able to play to the other without overpowering the entire project. The pairing of baritones could not have resulted better. "The Ballad of Dale and Ray" sets



the tone as playful, the duo trading lines and low harmonies, with jokes shot in between. Both bandleaders' traditional inclinations pull Dale & Ray, especially on the touchingly elegiac "Feelin' Haggard" and nod to Willie & Waylon covering "Write Your Own Songs." Standouts sharpen the close of the LP with the clever "A Hangover Ago," requisite state tribute "Nobody's Ever Down in Texas," and uplifting pluck of closer "Sittin' and Thinkin' About You." The joy of the two Austinites together shines throughout, informal yet masterful. It's a perfect pairing showcasing both artists. – Doug Freeman ****

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MUSIC LISTINGS RECOMMENDED THIS WEEK



Imagine the devastation in the local chapter of Ween's cult fanbase when the group's first Texas show in six years - a headlining appearance at last May's Levitation Fest was canceled over weather concerns. The genre-iumping goofballs' reunion tour never rounded back to the Lone Star State, so consider this Dean Ween Group engagement the rain check. Backing the guitarist/ vocalist are Claude Coleman Jr., Dave Dreiwitz, and Glenn McClelland - the full Ween, minus disenchanted singer/guitarist Aaron Freeman.

Dean, known formally as Mickey Melchiondo, remains an improbable guitar hero: shaggy hair, regular guy duds, oft barefoot and grinning widely, with a burning Marlboro stuffed between the strings and headstock of his Stratocaster. Meanwhile, maximum personality exudes from his amplifier, a crazed combination of Les Paul quirk and Jimi Hendrix spark rendered with such sweaty enthusiasm that he's joyously captivating in action. The Pennsylvania native classifies his debut solo album, October's

The Deaner Album, as a "guitar record." Thankfully, he's wrong.

Rather, it's a song album, albeit one indulging six-string explorations. The LP, written during Ween's 2011-2015 hiatus, spins an appropriately diverse stylistic spectrum ranging from Melvins-y sludge metal, bouncy

Southern rock, and freak funk. The caustic "Bundle of Joy," in which Deaner growls, "I'm a bad motherfucker and I take no shit/ Spend my last \$20 on a cocaine hit," recalls Melchiondo's other other band, sleaze punk warlords the Moistboyz, once operated locally by rascally frontman Guy Heller.

The Dean Ween Group's local connections remain vast: Meat Puppets' Curt Kirkwood. Pure Luck/Moistboyz member Stephen Haas, and Heller all contributed to the new album. Musical mad-scientist Mike Dillon, whose Nineties project Hairy Apes BMX was based locally, has guested on vox this tour and drummer Claude Coleman stayed in Austin while working on his Amandla project, which - Kevin Curtin opens.

MARDI GRAS BASH WITH CEDRYL **BALLOU & CLASSIE BALLOU** Antone's, Friday 3

Louisiana singer/guitarist Classie Ballou - that's his birth name - initially gained notoriety for playing on Boozoo Chavis' 1954 classic, "Paper in My Shoe," the first zydeco hit. After endless travel on the chitlin' circuit backing up the R&B stars of the day. he settled in Waco in 1963. Still vivacious at 79, he hasn't slowed down

for over 60 years. Accordion-squeezing grandson Cedryl Ballou fronts his long-established family band that parties with a rockin' brand of zydeco and R&B. Let the bons temps rouler! - Jay Trachtenberg

LEGENDARY SHACK SHAKERS **Continental Club, Friday 3** Established 1995 by J.D. Wilkes in the wilds of Kentucky, Legendary Shack Shakers took Southern roots idioms - blues, country, bluegrass, rockabilly - and made wild, primitive,

barrel-house punk rock out of 'em. Visionary mavericks from Joe Buck Yourself to Duane Denison have passed through their ranks, Wilkes still hog-callin', blowin' harp, and thrashin' a banjo. In 2015, they signed with Jello Biafra imprint Alternative Tentacles, which released The Southern Surreal that summer. – Tim Stegall

COLD CAVE Barracuda, Friday 3

Poet, author, and occasional Fall Out Boy collaborator Wesley Eisold abandoned new millennial hardcore stalwarts American Nightmare and

Some Girls to focus on gothic New Wave solo project Cold Cave. Anemic synths and abrasive drum machines swathe Eisold's baritone death rattle, evoking Bauhaus and the Smiths. "At night, I will think of you still, in a cage in my corner of hell," he croons on "Young Prisoner Dreams of Romance," proving age hasn't diluted his nihilistic fury. Bryan Rolli

JOAN OF ARC Barracuda, Saturday 4

Following the breakup of Chicago's essential emo mainstay Cap'n Jazz in 1995, Tim Kinsella formed Joan of Arc, releasing a deluge of strangely contentious experimentalism. Relying on formless, unusual arrangements occasionally punctuated by the sharp, math-y guitars of Kinsella's past and his trademark whiny affectation, Joan of Arc's output includes the new, fuzzy He's Got the Whole This Land Is Your Land in His Hands, which defies pop touchstones. - Libby Webster

AUSTRA Mohawk, Saturday 4

Katie Stelmanis always turned politics into art, but the timing of Future Politics - released the day of Donald Trump's inauguration - makes it a statement of urgency. The strippeddown electronics of her Toronto fourpiece, Austra, spin hopeful projections of a political ideal, ditching the burn-everything riot-grrrl ethos she embodied in former project Galaxy, and instead offering a bright, danceable future. That's something everyone needs currently. - Abby Johnston

DUBFIRE Kingdom, Saturday 4

Iranian-American DJ Dubfire (Ali Shirazinia) was formerly half of Washington, D.C.-born Deep Dish, a Grammy-winning progressive house duo. After breaking away, Shirazinia ventured into house, techno, and minimalism. His interest in tech-intensive, man-and-machine convergence manifested itself in his Hybrid live concept, debuting at the Amsterdam Dance Event in 2014. - Kahron Spearman

NOTS, US WEEKLY Hotel Vegas, Saturday 4

The Nots' 2014 debut, We Are Nots, unleashed a cacophony of brash, messy garage-punk laden with synths and led by Natalie Hoffman's grating, fuzzed-out howl. The Memphis fourpiece's Cosmetic continued down the same path last year, adding explic itly political lyrics. US Weekly pummels out rough, disjointed post-punk, the local quartet adding another level of prickly aggression. John Wesley Coleman III's best solo output yet, Microwave Dreams combines heartland rock, garage, twangs of country, and slacker drawl. - Libby Webster

INTERNATIONAL CLASH DAY W/ **RICK BROUSSARD** ABGB, Tuesday 7

Seattle mayor Edward B. Murray officially proclaimed Feb. 7, 2016, as International Clash Day, citing the Britpunk legends' roots experiments from reggae to rockabilly and inspiring future Pearl Jam-ite Jeff Ament. The Clash also made a number of memorable Austin stops in their heyday, filmed "Rock the Casbah"'s video here, and impacted many a local musician: Punkabilly Broussard told me "the Clash ... got me goin' on the roots stuff" privately last year. ABGB and Broussard host Austin's 2017 Clash Day celebration. - Tim Stegall

CARNIFEX. FALLUJAH **Grizzly Hall, Wednesday 8**

San Diego deathcore quintet Carnifex (Latin for "butcher") crammed sixth LP Slow Death with breakneck tremolo picking and atmospheric keyboards that recall symphonic black metal torchbearers Cradle of Filth and Dimmu Borgir. These influences mingle with down-tuned guitar chugs, triggered breakdowns, and death growls that root them on this side of the pond. S.F.'s Fallujah inject hypermelodic guitar licks into death metal, while fellow Bay Areans Rings of Saturn – Bryan Rolli pulverize "aliencore."

KARLA BONOFF One World Theatre, Wednesday 8

Karla Bonoff first received notice at 15 when Linda Ronstadt covered three of her tunes on 1976 blockbuster Hasten Down the Wind. The California native's compositions subsequently earned her a lifetime of respect. "I Can't Hold On," "Someone to Lay Down Beside Me," and many more have led her to work with the Eagles. Vince Gill. and Bonnie Raitt. In person, she stirs a whirlwind of emotion. - Jim Caligiuri

SARA WATKINS Antone's, Thursday 9

Fiddler and founding member of modern bluegrass smash Nickel Creek, Sara Watkins has flourished on her own for the better part of a decade. Latest solo release Young in All the Wrong Ways marks the first time she's penned an entire collection. She's also grown as a solo performer, honing her craft without the backing of brother Sean Watkins and Chris Thile and blossoming into an assured performer. - Abby Johnston

DAVID DONDERO Cactus Cafe, Thursday 9

David Dondero's songwriting warbles a mixture of vulnerability, sly wit, and connections both personal and universal. Following up 2013's acclaimed This Guitar, the Minnesotan recorded ninth studio LP Inside the Cat's Eye locally. The collection weaves both a fraught anxiety and searching beauty through Dondero's familiar quaking vocal. Silsbee's Lomelda opens with an acoustic set from frontwoman Hannah Read delivering last year's delicate sophomore effort 4E*. - Doug Freeman






