# Mardi Gras on Steroids: Drums, Dance and Flesh

Carnaval: "Better than Halloween, better than a rave. Way more fun than a concert. We left wanting more, more, more," says one party vet.

T'S THE BIG BEAT: RELENTLESSLY RHYTHMIC and sinuously seductive, rising up through your feet until it frees your mind from daily cares and concerns. It's the costumes, both flamboyantly disguising and frankly revealing, that dazzle and delight the eye with color and creativity. It's the atmosphere, electric with pulsating energy and excitement, and the audience, intoxicated by movement and glowing with its own inner electricity. It's Carnaval Brasileiro, and it's not to be missed, this year revving up on Saturday, February 25.

Organizers promise massive improvements for the 40th Anniversary: BETTER MUSIC, BETTER LIGHTS, BETTER SOUND! They say the music will be the best ever, the most exciting.

For 40 years Carnaval Brasileiro, essentially an authentic Brazilian-style Mardi Gras with a unique Austin attitude, has been the city's most colorful indoor extravaganza described succinctly in the Austin American-Statesman as "a festival of flesh, pounding drums and sensual abandon". Carnaval Brasileiro was attracting audiences in adventurous attire to spend the night indulging in dance floor revelry bordering on hysteria and/or ecstasy long before Keep Austin Weird bumper stickers were around.

The nature and intensity of the Carnaval experience is totally up to each individual participant. Costumes, whether elaborate constructions or mere body paint and not-much-more, are always amazing. Part of the reason is the air of freedom emanating from the fans fully exploring and enjoying the joys of public masquerade. "It's fun to get dressed up and be somebody else for a night," explains one Carnaval veteran."You can disguise yourself or turn yourself into a new person. Then you just lose yourself in the music and

the dancing. There's nothing like it."

Carnaval Brasileiro is such an embedded aspect of Austin entertainment culture that it's hard to believe it hasn't always been in existence.An informal coalition of homesick Brazilian students and music fans staged the first Carnaval in 1975 as two hundred samba fans gathered at the Unitarian Church. In 1978 Carnaval Brasileiro evolved to become a genuine citywide event with public presentations at major music venues, including the legendary Armadillo. Two years later the event moved to the City Coliseum, its homebase for the next two decades, where it morphed into an internationally recognized Austin institution.

Dandara Odara, an electrifying performer from Salvador, Bahia in northeasern Brazil, a city whose Carnaval is even more insane than Rio's famous blow out. Dandara and her seven-piece band will ignite partygoers with their authentic, fiery Brazilian carnaval rhythms. Sometimes referred to as the Ebony Goddess, Dandara's exceptional voice and her contagious way of moving, dancing and jumping on the stage has led her to be dubbed the Brazilian Tina Turner! Dandara has performed with the great names of Bahian Carnaval: Carlinhos Brown, Ivete Sangalo, Banda Eva, and Olodum.

Austin Samba, an assemblage of

150 local drummers and dancers specializing in Rio's street samba sounds, will also perform a Mardi Gras themed show: Nevilles and Fats in Samba!

Dana, a die-hard Carnaval fan, sums it all up: "Carnaval is some of the safest, best fun I have all year, one of the healthiest things I do for myself all year, an opportunity to dance and laugh with some of the nicest total strangers I could ever hope to meet, one of the biggest creative outlets I have on ALL KINDS of levels. I feel FREE at Carnaval. You don't need a costume, you don't need to drink. I guarantee you'll leave there with a happy heart," she says.

All those drums will tell you to forget about the fact you've got to go to work Monday, that exams are coming, or that the election didn't go your way. So, just surrender body and soul to the sound and focus on fun, in all its multi-hued merriment and gaiety. Join a conga line bouncing to the beat as it snakes through the costumed crowd. Tomorrow may never come. Give it up! Leave your world outside the door lose yourself in Carnaval Brasileiro!



### **DISMISSIVE & DEHUMANIZING**

Dear Editor.

I was shocked by the dismissive, dehumanizing tone of your cover story on homelessness Downtown ["It's Like a Jungle Sometimes," News, Feb. 3]. The article talks about homeless people as if they are wild animals or objects, certainly not human beings who might actually be able to answer some of the questions freely speculated about in the piece. The article actually uses the word "homeless" as a noun, subsuming people within this one aspect of their current circumstances ("Putting homeless in jail for ...," p.22). The pictures showing homeless people are all from behind or in the distance so that we cannot see their faces, painting them again as just props.

The article does not even pay lip service to the fact that it is homeless people themselves who are most affected by homelessness, instead painting them as merely a threatening backdrop the rest of us must somehow cope with. The author shares the perspective of only one person who works with homeless people, and does not interview any homeless people at all. Instead, he reports opinions about who the "problem" people are and why they may or may not be receiving services as if they were facts. The factual information that is provided is sparse and only loosely tied to the conclusions drawn or hinted at.

This article dehumanizes a vulnerable population and is just plain bad journalism.





**MEETING LIKE THIS** City Council meets today, Feb. 9, with a modest 51-Item agenda that includes a discussion of City Council meetings: How many is too many? Other business includes choosing a city manager search team, much-postponed City Auditor authority, and rezoning Plaza Saltillo. "Council: The Road to Elvsium." p.14.

LIVING IS EASY, Price Tag Is Hard: U.S. News & World Report, aka Rankings 'R' Us, announced Tuesday that Austin tops the mag's 2017 list of cities for "Best Places to Live," up one spot from 2016 (overtaking Denver). Mayor Steve Adler "celebrated what we're doing right," but acknowledged challenges in affordability, equity, and mobility.

**DON'T BURN, BABY** County commissioners issued the first burn ban of the year on Tuesday, due to "unusually warm temperatures, strong dry winds. and low relative humidity." The ban is expected to expire on March 6 unless the county judge, court, or fire marshal steps in. Commissioners will revisit outdoor burning on Feb. 14. Barbecuing in county parks is still allowed so long as the fire is "within a closeable container or a container with a lid."

ON THE AGENDA Progressive groups and legislators including Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, plan to launch a new reproductive health, rights, and justice policy campaign this week. The coordinated coalition includes the Lilith Fund for Reproductive Equity, NARAL Pro-Choice Texas, ACLU of Texas, and Jane's Due Process. See our online coverage Thursday for more.

DEPT. OF UNEDUCATION U.S. Senate Republicans, with the help of an unprecedented tie-breaking vote from Vice President Mike Pence, confirmed Betsy DeVos as Education Secretary on Tuesday, following a 24-hour filibuster by Senate Democrats. DeVos, a businesswoman and GOP donor with no teaching experience, is an opponent of public education and supporter of school vouchers and school choice.

**EVE OF DESTRUCTION** Donald Trump offered to "destroy" the career of a Texas state Senator Tuesday during a meeting with the National Sheriff's Association. The reason? The lawmaker is making it hard for Rockwall County Sheriff Harold **Eavenson** to engage in asset forfeiture. Eavenson didn't name any legislator, though chances are he's talking about Sen. Konni Burton, R-Colleyville, a #NeverTrumper who has fought for civil liberties to protect personal information and property.

APD FREEZER MALFUNCTION The broken freezer in APD's forensic lab may have stirred alarm about evidence collection, but Commander Michael Eveleth says none of the held samples were damaged. On Monday, Eveleth said the freezer contained evidence from 4,274 cases - 98.5% of which had already been analyzed. No issues have been reported. See more on p.13.



## The Whiplash Generation

### ON TRYING TO MAINTAIN HUMANE SANITY IN A DANGEROUSLY INSANE ERA

Undoubtedly like many Chronicle readers, these days I can't seem to shake a feeling of political whiplash. I'll be trying to remain focused on daily life, daily tasks -

work, home, chores, friends, family - only to be distracted hourly by the looming disaster burgeoning from D.C., with ominous echoes from the Capitol and the Governor's Mansion. I'll find myself stoically considering some difficult local issue -City Council pondering the strained EMS budget, or the endless conflicts over the land use code - when the lat-

est Trump regime outrage hits the web ... and pressing Austin matters get lost, even seem to become trivial, in a fog of anger.

On Tuesday it was the craven Senate Republican confirmation as Secretary of Education of Betsy DeVos, whose entire

educational credentials are itemized in her millions of dollars donated to GOP candidates, and in her conflicted investments in anti-public education companies. That

> folly was quickly followed by the debate over the confirmation of Alabama Sen. Jeff Sessions as attorney general, during which Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and his GOP colleagues voted to silence Sen. Elizabeth Warren (and to exclude her from further debate) because she "persisted" in reading a 1986 letter about Sessions by Coretta Scott King that they

didn't want to hear. (Sessions' nomination was confirmed on Wednesday evening.)

King's letter concerned Sessions' thennomination to a federal judgeship, and she wrote in part: "Anyone who has used the power of his office as United States Attorney

to intimidate and chill the free exercise of the ballot by citizens should not be elevated to our courts. Mr. Sessions has used the awesome powers of his office in a shabby attempt to intimidate and frighten elderly black voters. For this reprehensible conduct, he should not be rewarded with a federal judgeship."

McConnell would later explain silencing Warren with a tautology: "She was warned. She was given an explanation. Nevertheless, she persisted."

### **INTERSECTIONAL BATTLEGROUNDS**

Where have Austinites heard that before? McConnell's lipless sneer took me back to the 2013 state Senate filibuster by Wendy Davis, who spoke for 11 hours until transparently arbitrary applications of parliamentary rules forced her to stop. That was followed by the iconic moment when Sen. Leticia Van de Putte attempted to be recognized by the chair: "At what point must CONTINUED ON P.12

a female senator raise her hand or her voice to be recognized over her male colleagues?"

It's hardly an accident, and certainly worth noting, that King, Warren, Davis, and Van de Putte all have in common not only progressive politics, but gender. On Wednesday morning, male senators were allowed to read the King letter (there are more of them around, and the instant nationwide backlash had unnerved at least some Republicans). These details might seem coincidental, until one recalls that Davis was opposing yet another GOPsponsored law to restrict the reproductive rights of women, rights that have been reflexively dismissed and threatened by Trump – and that Sessions can be counted upon to undermine rather than defend at the Department of Justice.

So it is that what happens in Washington comes home to Austin, where it is reinforced by the GOP-dominated Legislature. Sessions' DOJ can also be counted upon to ignore the racial gerrymandering and voter suppression now in common practice in Texas, the South, and increasingly nationwide. Without it, neither so-called President Trump's Electoral College victory nor many precarious Republican state "majorities" would be possible. By gutting the Voting Rights Act to end preclearance of procedural changes that would discriminate against minorities, the Supreme Court made it easier for Texas and other states to do exactly that. And going forward, the Sessions Department of Justice. in any case, will be entirely disinclined to review any such practices.

### THE STRUGGLE CONTINUES

In this new national context, we'll all be repeatedly subject to political whiplash. Both the practice of political action and the tone of political discourse has been fundamentally altered by Donald Trump and his sycophants. To cite just one example, not only has Gov. Greg Abbott felt free to misrepresent federal immigration law in order to falsely accuse Travis County Sheriff Sally Hernandez of violating it, like his feckless mentor he's been liberated to tweet authoritarian threats: "Texas will hammer Travis County." (Abbott has occasionally been described as a potentially rational alternative to the shameless pandering of Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, but with Patrick nipping at his heels, Abbott will feel increasingly pressured to out-Trump him.)

On women's rights, immigration, voting rights, environmental protection and climate change, financial regulation, racial inequality, militarism - over the next few years, in all those contexts, we can expect the continuing experience of being yanked out of our personal routines into political shock and dismay. We will also be presented with a recurring choice, of either submissive quietism or adamant resistance. We could all do worse than follow Elizabeth Warren's example: "She was warned. She was given an explanation. Nevertheless, she persisted."

## Stating the Obvious

### ADLER'S "AUSTIN BARGAIN" MISSING SOME FINE PRINT

In a guest editorial published in the Feb. 8 Austin American-Statesman ("Consensus on CodeNEXT Key to Managing Growth"), Mayor Steve Adler lays out his vision of a grand compromise regarding the ongoing rewrite of the Land Development Code. Adler calls for a new "Austin Bargain" regarding the CodeNEXT ends: "For starters, let's agree we will not force density in the middle of **neighborhoods**. ... And in exchange, let's also agree that we

will adopt a code rewrite that will give us the housing supply we need by focusing along our most-trafficked streets and

our major busiest areas." So far, so good, If CodeNEXT

can indeed achieve both of those goals simultaneously, it will have few serious detractors, and will no doubt be hailed as a huge success, if not a minor miracle. But Mayor Adler illustrates his case with a couple of bits of tautology which suggests

the job ahead may be more difficult and complicated than he might like to admit.

First, Adler notes that currently, "every zoning case seems to require a variance or an exception of some kind from the Austin City Council." But of course, that's a lot like saying that every case that comes before a court seems to involve a dispute of some kind: Almost by definition, nothing becomes a "zoning case" unless someone is requesting "a variance or an exception" to the current zoning regulations. Now, if CodeNEXT can indeed clarify, simplify, and improve those regulations, as it promises - so that fewer minor alterations have to go through lengthy and expensive approval processes – that's great, and to everyone's benefit. But clearly. those aren't the cases that are vexing Council now, and conflating the amount of time and money it takes to get a simple remodeling permit from Development Review, with the amount of time and political capital it takes to mediate a major rezoning case, is more than a little disingenuous. And solving one problem does not necessarily lead to solving the other. Specifically, solving the recurring development wars that are waged down at City Hall will require Council to effect a more

or less permanent cease-fire between the two sides: first by enacting a new code and zoning map that can achieve the twin goals Adler lays out, but perhaps more importantly by then sticking to that code, and allowing it to govern development, without recourse to variances and exceptions that are so often requested of Council under the current code. If there's a 60-foot height limit on a tract, that's the limit, and a developer can't ask for a variance to get more, nor can a neighbor complain that that's too high. If we can get to

> that point, and keep both developer lobbyists and neighborhood activists out of the process that'll be a true Austin Bargain.

The mayor does go on to admit: "To do this, we'll need to make hard decisions in the transition areas between corridors, centers and our neighborhoods, but an Austin Bargain would mean that we would begin the code revision process

with agreement on as many as 95 percent of all properties in the city."

But again, one might also say that we already have agreement on 95% of all properties in the city. It may not seem that way, because the noise from that other 5% can get pretty intense, but you only need to drive down South Lamar, North Burnet, East Riverside, or any of the dozens of other thoroughfares, to realize that a hell of a lot of major developments continue to be permitted and built with no major public angst whatsoever. And once again, I don't mean to downplay the achievement here: To codify the tacit agreement on that 95% of properties – in line with Adler's twin goals and with Imagine Austin – would be huge by itself. But it doesn't necessarily get us any closer to resolving the deeply-felt disagreements regarding the 5% of properties that are already the areas of disagreement. "Hard decisions in the transition areas," indeed.

And, wouldn't you know it, the first of these thorny **transition areas** – perhaps the thorniest in the city - comes before Council today, at their Feb. 9 meeting, as the devel-

opers of Plaza Saltillo propose the first downtown-style development east of I-35. Opponents including the East Cesar Chavez Neighborhood Planning Team claim that Endeavor Real Estate Group, after winning a competitive bidding process to develop the 11-acre tract of public land, has "in an abrupt reversal" cut the amount of affordable housing drastically, and wants to double the height limit. "Neighbors want to hold Endeavor to its original promises of affordable housing and community-compatible, human-scale building height," they said in a statement released Wednesday afternoon.



### **APD's Backed Up DNA Backlog**

Austin Police Commander Michael Eveleth told the Public Safety Commission on Monday that the forensics unit he's overseen since late December still holds evidence requiring DNA testing from 3,294 sexual assault cases. That includes all newly filed cases as well as the cases that had built up in the department's backlog over the past couple of years, and the 2,454 kits that have been held in the "back backlog" - kits that have sat untested since the Nineties and are currently testing through the New York County D.A.'s Sexual Assault Kit Backlog Elimination Grant. Toward the end of 2016, it appeared as though APD's impending contract with Southwestern Institute of Forensic Science (SWIFS) would help eliminate the newer kits. But after just 22 cases were sent to SWIFS, the Dallas County lab canceled its contract. The 22 cases haven't been tested and have yet to be returned. Currently, the city's backlog is spread between SWIFS, Sorenson Forensics in Utah, Signature Science in North Austin, the FBI, Bode Cellmark Forensics, and the Department of Public Safety, where new cases are being sent. According to APD Assistant Chief Troy Gay, 24-30 new rape kits get filed each month. - Sarah Marloff

### **Environmental Defenders**

On Feb. 1, in a celebratory farewell at the Barr Mansion. Public Citizen honored longtime Texas director Tom "Smitty" Smith, who is retiring after 31 years of tireless and effective work on behalf of clean energy, environmental protection, and govern-



ment ethics reform ("The Man in the White Hat," Dec. 16, 2016). The event also served to announce Smitty's successor as director of Public Citizen's Texas office, Adrian Shelley, currently the executive director of anti-pollution nonprofit Air Alliance Houston. (Both organizations are members of the Healthy Port Communities Coalition.) Smitty announced his retirement in September, staying on during the search for his replacement; Shelley plans to continue at AAH during the search for his successor. In a press release announcing the appointment, Smitty called Shelley "a star in the environmental movement ... who is smart, dedicated and very tactical." Said Shelley, "Smitty is a hero of mine, and I am honored to continue his work in Austin" - Michael King

### **Dramatic Inaction**

A general strike against the president? There's a movement underway to make that happen next Friday. The idea, a grassroots initiative to sit Feb. 17 out - no shopping, no working, no nada – first got underway late last month when novelist Francine Prose issued a call to action in **The Guardian**. And while it's tough to tell what sort of national reception there is for the idea. a website, www.f17strike.com, advertises organizational efforts in 50 cities across the country, and 1,700 people have signed up on a national Facebook page. On Monday, organizers for the Women's March on Washington announced plans for their own general strike, "A Day Without a Woman." Details and a date for that one are still TBD, but expect it to reverberate much like the Jan. 21 marches. - Chase Hoffberger

### **Fate of Simple Recycling Not So Simple**

City Council did its best to mollify the mood in the standoff between Simple Recycling and **Goodwill, Salvation** Army, and the **Assistance League of** 



Austin last Thursday, Feb. 2, when it instructed the city manager to spend the next six months collecting data that would indicate whether or not the new presence of the for-profit textile recycling company is having any adverse effect on business for the local charities. The city entered into a three-year contract with Simple Recycling in December (through Austin Resource Recovery, circumventing a vote from Council), but the three charities argued that after a month, the company's curbside pickup service has had a negative impact on local donations ("Council Takes out the Trash?," Feb. 1). "We hope a transparent and objective data gathering process is put in place to understand resident behaviors, preferences, and outcomes," said Adam Winfield, president of Simple Recycling. He expressed a desire to work with local nonprofits to "create options and solutions for the material" that previously went to landfills.

Council's decision - an ad hoc compromise in lieu of cutting Simple Recycling's contract altogether - didn't completely assuage the charities' concerns. ALA President Kathy Hurwitz told the Chronicle she fears that after six months, residents will "become accustomed" to curbside pickup. "The extra effort to deliver donations will outweigh their allegiance to us," she said. Traci Berry, senior vice president of Goodwill's Community Engagement, said she was "disappointed" with the outcome, despite calling it a step in the right direction, "We believe that the city should be looking for homegrown solutions that ensure we are meeting all of the goals of our community, not just zero waste," she said. She acknowledged Council's attention and applauded ARR's efforts to create a public service announcement that would educate Austinites on donation options.

### Rackspace Backs Out

Austin Community College is learning the hard way to check the paperwork. Cloud computing company **Rackspace** had plans to move its Austin offices into the ACC Highland campus. Construction and renovation had already begun. Recently, however, Apollo Global Management, the private equity firm that bought Rackspace last year, realized that no lease agreement had been signed, and has since walked away from the project, leaving ACC in the lurch. The Rackspace deal was supposed to be the next stage in a process that initiated when ACC began acquiring the Highland property in 2010. Classes began in the failing mall in 2014, before ACC took over the entire site in 2015. Highland Mall proved a lot more property than the college needed, however, so the aim became to set up business incubators and secure a major tenant, one that could potentially provide workplace training and opportunities for students. Enter (and exit) Rackspace - though the company may now be less likely to serve as a destination for ACC graduates. This week, it announced it was laying off 6% of its U.S. workforce, including employees in Austin and San Antonio.



## The Road to Elysium

### COUNCIL DIGS INTO MULTIFAMILY DEVELOPMENT

Last Thursday's City Council meeting was mercifully brief ("Ready for Solar and Recycling Too," Feb. 6), and today's 51-Item agenda (Feb. 9) doesn't appear too daunting - although it's worth noting that the list includes proposed committee-and-meeting changes, so they may spend some meeting time debating better meetings. Less likely to cause dissension are 11 resolutions (Items 11-21) from the **Department of** Neighborhood Housing and Community Development, requesting Council approval of developer applications for state lowincome tax credits helping underwrite several multifamily projects across the city.

One of those is the Elysium Park project, which at last week's meeting received Council's first-reading approval of a zoning change (from light-industrial to multifamily residential) that, if sustained, will enable an 84-unit, deeply affordable complex on Oak Creek Drive, just west of MoPac above Parmer Lane. The project first came to Council (in a slightly different form) in August, but foundered (and was postponed) due to nearby neighborhood opposition and an abstention by state Rep. Celia Israel, who declined to write a letter of support that would have made the ranking difference at the state **Department of Housing** and Community Affairs. ("Affordability: Everywhere but Here," Aug. 8, 2016.)

Based on last week's testimony, the neighborhood opposition persists - the explicit reasons are transportation and flooding issues, but with the usual undercurrent of anxiety over nearby low-income housing. Council heard the complaints, but noted that no site is perfect, and voted unanimously to approve the zoning change.

In August, Israel pointed to her support of similar projects elsewhere in her district, and cited lack of mass transit and poor pedestrian accessibility for her "remaining neutral" on Elysium Park (although those problems in fact affect not just prospective

tenants, but everybody who lives nearby). Asked this week if her position might change in light of the unanimous Council support, she said her staff is still reviewing the project. "I hope I will be able to support it," she said, while reiterating her concerns about transportation near the site. (To address that objection, Saigebrook **Development** says it has set aside funds for a potential shuttle service for the complex.)

With variations, such objections are likely to be raised over one or more of the nine projects to be contemplated for tax-credit application today, less in front of Council (where pro forma state application approval is likely) than in the documentation weeds of the developers consulting with neighborhoods and city and state

agencies. Yet if the city is to be seriously dedicated to increasing the supply of affordable housing, these kinds of projects bear considerable promise to fulfill that goal. Elsewhere on the agenda. Council will consider:

• Mobile Bonding: Staff returns with a recommendation (Item 4) for an engineering firm to begin work on the Corridor projects approved in last year's Mobility Bond (staff recommends HDR Engineering, but there are other contenders).

• Search Me: To find a City Manager to succeed Marc Ott (and interim CM Elaine Hart), staff originally recommended publicsector search firm Ralph Anderson & Assoc. Council asked for a wider net, so today's list (Item 29) also includes a joint in hopes of streamlining systems that have remained ponderous. They did not sound close to a resolution - anticipate more gumflapping.

· Downtown East: Mayor Steve Adler is offering an omnibus resolution (Item 33) that would direct staff to compile ways to design and fund improvement projects on the east side of Downtown (roughly from the new Dell Medical School complex to

> the Austin Convention Center – the latter the subject of a Tuesday briefing on potential expansion and its funding). This is a Big Gulp of research, and might well be broken into separate parts.

• Development Development: The new, customer-friendly **Development Services Dept.** is outgrowing its digs on Barton Springs Road, and proposes (Item 24) purchasing five acres near Austin Community College at Highland Mall as a site for a one-stop shop. This item would authorize initial negotiation of the deal; some CMs seemed skeptical of both the necessity and the location, so approval is uncertain.

· Zoning Saltillo: Of the handful of zoning cases, three (Items 43-45) concern Plaza Saltillo, with details still under dispute among various neighborhood factions. (District 3 CM Pio Renteria hosted yet another meeting among stakeholders Tuesday

afternoon, in hopes of an agreement.)

And in other business, Council continued its early, informal review of departmental budgets, targeting a better grasp of the overall budgeting context, once the detail work begins in late spring. Wish them well. - Michael King

## **Confusion, Misery, Worry: The Immigration Ban in Texas**

America remains a refuge for those escaping peril in their home countries. On Monday, Feb. 6, volunteers turned out at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport to welcome a family of migrants. They were the first Syrians to resettle in Texas since the federal courts issued a stay on President **Donald Trump**'s executive order banning immigration from seven majority-Muslim countries. Yet as the legal battle continues, charities and businesses struggle to make sense of who is and isn't allowed to enter the country.

Awaiting Tuesday's hearing before the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, Refugee Services of Texas spokesman Chris Kelley said Trump's order had caused "a lot of confusion." By last Friday, Feb. 3, when it reached a Washington federal judge, the order had been rewritten and reinterpreted to clarify whether or not green card holders and U.S. passport holders with dual citizenship would be affected. Then, Secretary of Defense James Mattis had the order amended to exempt special immigration visa holders, which Kelley explained were issued "primarily to advisers and translators who assisted U.S. forces in Iraq and Afghanistan." They're an important part of RST's business, accounting for around 25% of all refugees to the state, and placed here because of the large number of military personnel with whom they may have

The ban also caused disturbance among businesses, especially engineering and IT companies, that rely on international employees. However, White House Chief Strategist Steve Bannon and Attorney General nominee **Jeff Sessions** have both railed against the H1B visas under which they work. Prior to Tuesday's hearing, 96 companies, including Dropbox, Facebook, and PayPal, all three of whom have Austin

offices, filed an amicus brief against the order, arguing that it was discriminatory and harmed the competitiveness of U.S. firms.

In line with the brief, Greater **Austin Chamber of Commerce** Senior Vice President of Policy Drew Scheberle countered that the chamber actually wants to broaden H1Bs. Noting that Austin is a "global talent destination," with 20% of its population born in a foreign country, he said, "We oppose blanket exclusion of anyone based upon religion." He added: "We hope the president and elected leaders will explore ways to ensure Austin-based employers have access to the best talent to grow jobs here in this region and this country."

Yet the most immediate impact may well have been on refugees. The original text of the order imposed a 90-day block on citizens of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Svria, and Yemen, However, it also suspended the U.S. Refugee Admissions Pro-

gram for 120 days; that blocked all refugees, no matter the nationality, from entering the U.S., and that extended to an indefinite ban on refugees fleeing the Syrian conflict. According to Refugee Services of Texas, as of Jan. 31 a total of 2,143 refugees were scheduled for admittance into the country. That number was cut to 872, with 55 arriving in Texas. So when the order came down. it left 1,271 people in limbo - people who had already given up their lives in whichever country they were residing. Kelley said, "They have sold all their property, they have guit their jobs, and they are in these three-day schedules of packing."

SARA Organization, which provides assistance to Syrian refugees moving to



Austin, issued a statement on the order: "For the existing refugee population, it created confusion, misery, worries about their situation, and doubts about the U.S. fulfillment of obligations." As for refugees in transit, either coming to the U.S. for the first time or merely traveling internationally, the order was "a disaster. ... Some had to go back in danger and into much more miserable conditions than they had before the start of their journey."

Kelley said RST has no issue with vetting refugees to ensure public safety, and said, "If there is more that can be done which isn't an ideological religious test, then certainly we want a safe border." But he noted that refugees coming to America already go through

> the most rigorous vetting of any nation. The U.S. will only consider those classified as vulnerable families, or those facing oppression because of issues such as race or sexuality. Priority consideration is given to anyone with a family support system already in the country, or otherwise classified as a likely candidate for a successful resettlement. Once they pass those hurdles, it's an 18-24 month process, with multiple interviews, biometrics, blood samples, and an examination of their social media history, if they have one. Kelley said, "If even a question is raised about somebody, they are removed." The U.S. only accepts 0.5% of all refugees globally, and is currently capped to accept only 50,000 refugees this year.

> Yet while aid agencies waited for the appeals court ruling and a potential Supreme Court hearing, the presumption is that they will keep settling and assisting those fleeing conflict. Both SARA and RST reported an out-

pouring of support and donations since the order, with Kelley noting that assistance came from across the political and religious spectrum. With Texas ready to take its share of the roughly 2,000 refugees arriving in the U.S. before Feb. 17, he said, "It's full - Richard Whittaker speed ahead."

### **COUNTY CROWDFUNDING**

Following Gov. Greg Abbott's decision to pull \$1.5 million in Criminal Justice Division grants from Travis County - political reprisal for Sheriff Sally Hernandez's refusal to comply with noncriminal detainer requests from **U.S. Immigrations** 

& Customs Enforcement – a new community-centered funding strategy has emerged. On Friday,

Feb. 3, state Rep. Eddie

Rodriguez, D-Austin, in collaboration with other elected reps and progressive groups, launched a crowdsourcing website to fill (at least some of) the void by collecting tax-

deductible donations from the community. The Travis County "Stronger Together" campaign collaborates with local nonprofit Austin Community Foundation to prevent the abrupt end of "crucial" county programs, including drug diversion, family violence prosecution and outreach, veterans' court, and victim services. Abbott is willing to sacrifice services for women, children, and veterans to "score political points" and the campaign is meant to show the governor the "power of love," said Rodriguez.

Rodriguez told the Chronicle his initiative sends a message to Abbott that Travis County citizens won't take the misguided punishment lying down. "This is political retribution. Abbott's playing games with people's lives and it's unacceptable," he said. "And he's removing money that doesn't even go to the Sheriff's Office - that's either shortsighted or fool-hearted on his part. When I heard the news, I thought, let's have Travis County chip in and stand up for itself against a governor who has used them as a political example."

What does Rodriguez say to any critics who contend that tax-

payers shouldn't have to supply donations to recoup defunded services?

"Well, the short answer is that this funding shouldn't have been cut in the first place," he relayed. "The bottom line is that as citizens of the county, we should be able to get these important services."

On Tuesday, county commissioners voted unanimously (with lone Republican commissioner Gerald Daugherty absent) to continue funding the programs impacted by the cuts at roughly \$100,000 a month and to begin a three-month rebudgeting process to explore other ways to mitigate the damage. Aside from the crowdfunding campaign, County Judge Sarah

**Eckhardt** said the Commissioners Court is likely to dip into reserves to recoup the loss. For now, the court will eliminate four vacant full-time positions funded by the diminished grants. and extend 14 full-time filled positions to May 15. Those jobs could be in jeopardy after that time, but commissioners will

assess how the positions could continue based on the costs and benefits to the community.

Commissioner Brigid Shea called the governor's attack on the county "shameful" and pointed out that some of the programs impacted - such as diversion, which prevents jail time - save taxpaver money. Commissioners estimate 5.000 Travis County residents will be affected by the cuts.

Hernandez and Eckhardt have both endorsed the campaign. The sheriff wrote in a Facebook post: "Together, we can raise the funds necessary to ensure that our community's values are represented and that the most vulnerable in our community are receiving the assistance they need." Thanking the fundraising organizers, Eckhardt encouraged those who have created similar crowdsourcing sites to coordinate with Austin Community Foundation. An unaffiliated GoFundMe campaign set up by private citizen Kevin Darryl had raised more than \$7,000 before merging with ACF. In its first 24 hours the ACF campaign raised more than \$50,000. That figure had shot up to \$104,937 by the time we went to press; over 1,560 people have donated so far. Rodriguez hopes to raise the full \$1.5 million, saying that if the donation rate maintains, organizers could reach their goal in one month. "It's now up to the generosity of Travis County folks," he said. - Mary Tuma

## Turn the Page

### CHRIS TURNER AND A NEW PATH FOR STATEHOUSE DEMS

When Chris Turner took to the dais in the Speaker's Press Room after Gov. Greg Abbott's Jan. 31 State of the State address. the new chair of the Texas House Democratic Caucus almost sounded conciliatory. The Grand Prairie representative opened with a softball: "We agree with Governor Abbott on one thing," he said. "Texas is exceptional." Turner also conceded that there were a few points of policy agreement between the governor and state Dems - but as for the rest of Abbott's agenda, his description was short and brusque: "Needlessly divisive, pointless, and frankly ... a waste of time for this Legislature."

A few days later, like everyone else, Turner was absorbing the fallout of the latest push toward GOP radicalism at both the state and national level. He hadn't seen any news by the time we spoke, he said. "Are we in a new war yet?" Not yet, but not for Trump's lack of trying. "These guys are learning governing is hard."

So is life in opposition. In taking over the caucus, Turner inherits a party that only holds 55 positions in a 150-seat chamber. He can take solace in the fact that Speaker Joe Straus lets House members dictate much of the session's direction, leaving opportunities for deals and collaborations: Across the dome, his Senate counterpart Sen. José Rodríguez, D-El Paso, faces "my way or the highway" domineering from Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick. There's what Turner called Patrick's "top 30 priorities," all seemingly drawn from the executive branch's list of time wasters, "whether it's private school vouchers, or this weird, unnecessary bathroom bill."

Even while Straus has yet to announce committee appointments (the first vital stage before bills can be heard), and Abbott and Patrick have been stealing headlines, Turner has been busy. His first job calls for a dusting off of the caucus as an operating entity after 19 months away from the Legislature: establishing clear lines of communication, with clear support for membership. Most important, he said, has been establishing "a clear message of what House Democrats stand for, what we're fighting for." He said he thinks Democrats got work-

ing on that "the day after the election, with the response to the State of the State address."

To turn a well-worn phrase, this isn't Turner's first rodeo. He already served as chair, during the 2013 session, but in that iteration of the party hierarchy, that made him the number two behind caucus leader Rep. Yvonne Davis. D-Dallas. Now he holds the retitled top position. Following

Davis and her predecessor, Houston's Jessica Farrar, Turner is the first white male to lead the delegation since Jim Dunnam in the 81st Session. Both represent rarities within a caucus of primarily minority and female representatives: Dunnam numbered among the last of the Anglo male Dems from a rural district, representing Waco before HGTV and Chip and Joanna Gaines made it cool, while Turner is the only white male Dem to hold an urban or suburban seat. (Grand Prairie is located in Dallas and Tarrant counties.) And, like Dunnam, Turner lost his seat in 2010. Difference is, he got one back. Turner, who first came to the Lege in 2008, won a seat in 2012 after losing in 2010 because Republican gerrymandering in 2011 drew him into a blue seat. He's free to swing for the fences

any Republican opponent. Fortunately for the Dems, Turner is okay with being a slugger. In 2014, when Sen.

Wendy Davis' gubernatorial campaign was floundering and spending cash on out-ofstate consultancies, Turner came in to help right a sinking ship. Under his management, Davis may not have won, but she gained a coherent strategy (attacking Abbott over ethical conflicts) and pulled

closer to the soon-to-begovernor than at any point in the campaign. That came in part from Turner applying earlier political lessons learned on four campaigns with Congressman Chet Edwards, famous for being the Democrat who held the most Republican seat in America (Texas' 11th). Turner says the strategy boils down to two prime tactics: Make your message clear, and leave everything on the field.

He has been known to walk a fine diplomatic line, as likely to get an award from the Texas Veterans of Foreign Wars as Equality Texas.

He also has Dunnam's instinct on when to play bipartisan politics and when to go for the throat. When House Republicans tried to disrupt Davis' 2013 filibuster by presenting her with 84,610 sheets of paper (to represent the number of Texan abortions in 2008), Turner stood outside their press conference and nakedly accused them of a "cheap political stunt." Yet his attacks can sometimes have a bipartisan spin. In his response to the State of the State address, he challenged Abbott to live up to his commitments to kids in foster care, asking him to tell Attorney General **Ken Paxton** to quit

fighting the court ruling that the current system is unconstitutional. He expects to find common ground with House Republicans, especially Straus, who he said "will, by and large, keep the House focused on solutions to real problems, whether it's public education, mental health care, or child protective services.

"We may, and probably will, disagree on those issues, and the best ways to resolve them, but at least we agree on what the issues are," he said.

> Aside from getting the gang on the floor back together, Turner's first business as caucus leader will be analyzing his Capitol bench. A lot of talent has gone, such as veteran legislators Sylvester Turner (now mayor of Houston) and Austin's Elliott Naishtat (retired). They had committee seniority, but took another big hit with the departure of Trey Martinez Fischer: Whenever Republicans got a controversial bill to the floor, it would only be a matter of time until the San Antonio Dem would be at the back mic throwing out procedural road-

blocks. Turner suggested that there is plenty of talent in his team of 55: "I'm optimistic that, while outnumbered, Democrats can make an impact."

The reality is that Dems have been markedly ineffective since the Tea Party's takeover, and that's not just about the total numbers. Last session, some Dem reps on the floor quietly fumed that, even when they theoretically had enough nays to defeat legislation, enough of the caucus was AWOL to leave them powerless to oppose. Moving forward, it'll be Turner's duty to rally the forces. - Richard Whittaker

### LAWMAKING WHILE DRIVING

HB 62 - Author: Rep. Tom Craddick, R-Midland

Ever sat at a junction with a green light and the car in front of you won't move? Of course you have, and the odds are that driver was busy futzing with their phone. Finally, the Texas Legislature may do something about driving while texting. Well, finally may be the wrong word. Former House Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland, has filed a hands-free cell phone bill during each of the last three sessions. In 2011, it passed both House and Senate, only to be vetoed by former Gov. Rick Perry; then in 2013 and 2015, Craddick's bill passed the House, but went down in the Senate. Yet, in an attempt to cut down

on Texas' share of the thousands of distracted driving fatalities nationally every year, Craddick is trying again, via House Bill 62.

Texas is one of the few holdouts on this issue. It's one of only four states - along with Arizona, Missouri, and Montana - that still allows texting while driving. Even within the state, the practice is becoming less acceptable, with nearly 100 municipalities enacting local bans (including Austin). Craddick's measure would simply create more predictable regulations, standardize fines, and place warning signs everywhere a highway crosses state lines. The bill does have three exemptions: licensed CB radio users, people calling emergency services, or anyone receiving an emergency call or text. For others, it only applies while the vehicle is actually moving. Richard Whittaker

## Poetry in Prison

### FREEHAND ARTS PROJECT STEPS INTO THE COUNTY JAIL

Every few days, **Murphy Anne Carter** drives out to the **Travis County Correctional Complex** in Del Valle to teach creative writing and art classes to a group of female inmates. Between three and 17 inmates are at each lesson; they range in age from 19 to 65. One day, Carter decides that the class will draw self-portraits, a standard art lesson. However, there are no mirrors for the students to look into to see their faces; they must draw themselves from memory.

A classroom in a state penitentiary conforms to a standard of criteria unlike most other learning centers. The pencils Carter's students use must be shorter than a finger (lest they be labeled a weapon). Notebooks are forbidden. Most days in Carter's classroom, students read poems, discuss them, and create their own work that they can share. Participation in the class has been a cathartic experience for many of them.

"In almost every class I've taught, at least one person has cried. And in every class, everyone laughs at one point or another – and that one's probably my own selfish goal," said Carter. "But I've had women come up to me after class and say that my class is the only time they don't feel like they're in prison."

Created in 2014 by **Kelsey Shipman**, the **Freehand Arts Project** brings highly qualified volunteers to the county jail

to teach classes on creative writing, art, and poetry. (Carter joined on as co-director in 2016.) Freehand has reached hundreds of inmates as well as officers, and has been instrumental in publishing two anthologies of inmates' writings, poetry, and drawings –  $Jail\ Fat$  and Jam – that will soon be available online. Shipman, a middle school teacher and poet, said she relishes the opportunity to "bring so much light" to a dark environment.

"Everything is so structured and regimented in jail," she said. "Even the architecture is meant to make you feel small and powerless. Creative writing is so powerful because you get to transform your pain and negative feelings ... into something that can no longer control you. I've seen a lot of amazing transformations. I think it's really important and can make a big difference even if it's incremental. It's true rehab because it teaches people what to do with feelings."

This emotional intelligence that Freehand teaches is critical for individuals as American incarceration rates continue to rise and resources for prisoners remain in short supply. Over the past three decades, the number of inmates in America's jails and prisons has risen from about 300,000 to over 2 million people. America's incarceration rate currently runs four times higher than the historic average, and rough-



ly seven times what's seen in Western Europe. According to the Sentencing Project, there were 1.2 million women in the criminal justice system in 2014. Between 1980 and 2014, the number of incarcerated women grew by more than 700%.

In November, Freehand launched a Kickstarter to fund the printing of a third anthology of work from women at TCCC. They exceeded their funding goal of \$1,000 within three days. When the women in Carter's creative writing class heard that, "everyone cried," she said. "They couldn't believe that anyone, much less a group of strangers, would want to read what they've written or fund a chance for that writing to be compiled and published." The anthology will come out this spring.

Beyond the anthology, Carter and Shipman have big plans for Freehand. Right now, the group coordinates with 10 volunteers. Carter and Shipman would like to find a way to pay them. They also want to expand to other state facilities, and perhaps open a space where student artwork can be displayed, so that Freehand students can return to a supportive environment and make work, even after their time in jail is over.

"It's crazy how many of the healthy, strong relationships that form inside of jail, where everyone is sober and vulnerable, fade once they're released," says Carter. "The time in there isn't time wasted, although it certainly isn't a humanist time. In my dream world, there could be a place where the good part of that time could be preserved."



n the Sunday morning after Donald Trump won the presidential election, Austin Mayor Steve Adler stood in blue jeans and a white button-down shirt before a crowd outside of City Hall. "I understand that you're angry and scared, hurt and confused," he said, pausing so an interpreter could translate his words from English to Spanish. "Many of us are. And that includes me."

Immigrants and allies, also wearing white, had gathered to protest one of then-President-elect Trump's most alarming campaign promises: plans to deport 11 million undocumented immigrants. Austin welcomes immigrants and will stand with them, Adler said, before offering his reassurance in Spanish himself. "Quiero que sepan que sus líderes, en este edificio que se encuentra a nuestras espaldas, nos comprometemos a la seguridad de ustedes y de sus familias," he said. "You need to know that your leaders, in the building behind us, are committed to your safety and your family's."

Adler spoke for 12 minutes. "In Austin, we build bridges, not walls," he said, noting that Austin has long accepted refugees while remaining one of the safest cities in the country. He promised that Austin would join forces with other U.S. cities to protect its vulnerable residents, immigrants among them. "There is great power in cities united," he added.

But throughout his speech, Adler did something interesting. The mayor never referred to Austin as a sanctuary city.

The term "sanctuary city" is a controversial, evocative, and vague one. It bears no legal standard or definition. It's wholly interpretable. For some, the phrase conjures images of the early Christian church offering refuge to the desperate. For others, it alludes to a set of concrete policies that limit a city's cooperation with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). In recent years, "sanctuary city" has become a bogeyman for GOP lawmakers, who use it in statements and stump speeches to typify a threat to local safety - or, worse, a symbol of defiance that they will punish. While cities like San Francisco have proudly declared themselves sanctuaries, Austin lawmakers have shied from its use since at least 1985, avoiding the lightning-rod term in favor of more neutral phrasing like "welcoming city."

"Sanctuary city" routinely pits cities against states, as evidenced here in Travis County. On Feb. 1, the Travis County jail stopped releasing inmates to federal immigration authorities - a so-called "sanctuary policy" introduced by the county's new sheriff, Sally Hernandez. That same morning, Gov. Greg Abbott cut \$1.5 million in criminal justice grants to Travis County in response to Hernandez's policy. Members of both the state's Senate and House of Representatives have filed anti-sanctuary bills this session - bills that would dramatically affect public safety operations in every Texas city. President Trump has put forth an executive order that would force local law enforcement to cooperate with federal authorities, and even take on the role of immigration agents.

## **Matters More** Than the Law

Sanctuary cities and the ways we fight for human rights

The groundswell raises an important question: Moving forward, what will "sanctuary city" mean to Austin?

### **SANCTUARY AS POLICY**

"Is Austin a sanctuary city?" Sulma Franco considers the question from a booth at a noisy Waffle House, pausing over a plate of eggs. The Guatemalan activist raises her eyebrows: "No," she says, jabbing her fork in the air to punctuate. "No, no, no, no."

Ironically, it is Franco who brought sanctuary to Austin's religious communities. Facing deportation orders, in 2015 she walked through the doors of the First Universalist Unitarian Church and stayed there for 10 weeks until her legal case was temporarily resolved, thus becoming the first person in Texas to claim church sanctuary since the Eighties (see "New Name, Same Game," July 10, 2015). But Franco persists: "The Latino community does not feel that Austin is a sanctuary city - por nada. Not at all."

Fearing deportation, Austin's undocumented immigrants do not feel safe in their daily lives, says Franco. She explains a term widely used in the city's Latino community: polimigra. It's a blend of the Spanish words for "police" and "immigration," reflecting the notion that the two law enforcement entities - one local, one federal - are, in fact, one and the same.

That perception has roots in reality, says Franco. Greg Hamilton, Hernandez's predecessor, who served as sheriff from 2005 through 2016, made no bones about his willingness to work with ICE, the deportation arm of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). Under its Priority Enforcement Program (PEP), which in 2015 expanded the Bush-era program known as Secure Communities (S-Comm), immigration authorities ask local jails - which are usually run by the county sheriff's department - to hold people after they've been ordered released. These "detainers," as they're called, give ICE time to investigate inmates' immigration statuses and transfer them to a detention center, possibly deporting them.

Federal courts have ruled that ICE detainer requests are just that - requests. During Hamilton's tenure, Travis County honored every such request, resulting in some of the highest deportation rates in the country, according to a 2014 resolution from City Council. Until 2009, the Travis County jail fielded less than 10 detainer requests each year, according to records held by the sheriff's department. That number has since skyrocketed: In the two years between 2012 and 2014, said Council's resolution, Hamilton complied with roughly 5,500 detainers, nearly three-fourths of which were for people whose criminal charges were eventually dropped. In the four years between June 2009 and June 2014, an average of 19 people were deported from the county each week. The Austin American-Statesman reported that nearly 10,000 ICE detainers have been issued in the last decade - more than half for people charged with one misdemeanor. ICE rarely sends warrants with detainers, says professor Elissa Steglich at UT School of Law's immigration clinic. That, in and of itself, is a violation of residents' Fourth Amendment rights to proper search and seizure.

That all changed with Hernandez's election, and, in turn, her Jan. 20 announcement. "Our jail cannot be perceived as a holding tank for ICE," the sheriff, previously a county constable in Precinct 3, said in her filmed statement. She later told the Chronicle: "We in law enforcement have had a difficult time with trust in our community and especially in our communities of color. And so the ability to have these communities feel like it's safe to call and cooperate with us - I feel like it's going to have a huge impact."

Miranda, an undocumented mother from Mexico who historically has avoided contacting police - hesitating even when she discovered her husband was sexually abusing her 8-year-old daughter - agreed. "Wow," she said, when told of the change. "It's so exciting to know we can count on police when we need them."

There are caveats to Hernandez's policy. The sheriff still intends to honor detainers that come with court-ordered warrants.

Hernandez also said she will comply with detainer requests of individuals charged with murder, sexual assault, human trafficking, and certain other crimes. But the county policy stands as stark departure from that prescribed by her predecessor, and represents a bold declaration of noncompliance in a state governed by an ICE advocate.

Abbott's response has been equally bold. The governor didn't just cut grants to Travis County, slashing program funds for veterans, prostitution prevention, and families affected by drug use; Abbott also threatened to remove Hernandez, an elected official, from her post. In his State of the State address on Jan. 31, Abbott made sanctuary cities an emergency legislative item and pledged to ban them by the end of the session. Of the many anti-sanctuary bills filed in both state

chambers, immigrant advocates most fear SB 4, which would outlaw sanctuary jurisdictions throughout Texas by making detainer requests mandatory. The bill would also strip state money from city, county, and collegecampus police for noncompliance. (The Senate voted to approve SB 4 this week, moving it on to the House.)

Such bills are a perennial feature of Texas legislative sessions, but SB 4 has been filed at a time when anti-sanctuary sentiments are particularly intense at both the state and federal level. As mentioned, President Trump also opposes sanctuary policies. On Jan. 25 he issued an executive order requiring full cooperation between

DHS and local law enforcement. The order, which has since been challenged in court, would target a broader range of undocumented people, empower state and local law enforcement to act as immigration officers, and create a public bulletin announcing crimes committed by undocumented immigrants – who, according to numerous studies, are less prone to crime than people born in the United States.

Within the city of Austin, police chiefs have testified against state bills that would force their departments to work with federal immigration agencies. But APD lacks written policy concerning its officers' interactions with undocumented immigrants – nothing in its manual prevents officers from asking someone's legal status, for example. City Council Member Greg Casar stressed, however, that APD does not – and will not – work closely with immigration authorities. "Our police officers have neighborhood beats," he said. "They do not have deportation beats. They will not be enforc-

ers of Trump policies or politics." Casar hopes to introduce a resolution soon that would end collaboration not just between immigration authorities and APD, but also the city government.

### **SANCTUARY AS WELCOME**

As lawmakers battle out sanctuary policies, word is taking hold in other spheres. Across the country, universities, businesses, and houses of worship are declaring sanctuary in greater numbers – what's being called the New Sanctuary Movement. Nationally, the number of religious communities offering sanctuary to immigrants doubled to 450 in the weeks following November's election; according to movement leaders, that number is now at 700. In Austin, University of Texas students have

joined some 100 schools nationwide clamoring for a "sanctuary campus," with petitions and a student government resolution calling on the university to declare sanctuary; two restaurants -Black Star Co-op and L'oca d'oro - have named themselves sanctuaries; and the interfaith Austin Sanctuary Network has formed to harbor immigrants in need.

"Sanctuary, the idea of saving people who are in danger, of ferrying them to a safe place, of claiming the ancient tradition of churches as sanctuaries; it captures people's emotions in a very powerful way," said Jennifer Long, director of Casa Marianella, a local immigrant shelter. Long said the city massionate and reason-

for Casa Marianella, a local immigrant shelter. Long said the city of Austin has a "compassionate and reasonable policy," noting City Council's December 2016 resolution to channel funds to legal groups that help immigrants facing deportation. Though she often wonders if the city's efforts will be enough.

"[Former President Barack] Obama deported 2 million people," she said. "There are private prisons. And it's all very invisible to the American people. That's already happening before you even get to Trump." With global refugee crises in the Middle East, Central America, and Africa, the need for spaces like Casa Marianella is now "terrible," said Long. Marianella's beds are overflowing; many sleep on the floor.

Private citizens also sense the need. Cara, a 28-year-old venture capitalist, began renting a room to Ethiopian and Malawian refugees in 2015 for \$150 per month – a highly subsidized rate for a Central Austin apartment – after hearing about two German social workers who had offered their extra

bedrooms to Syrian refugees, an act that turned into the nonprofit Refugees Welcome. On Saturday (Feb. 4), a federal judge in Washington issued a block on President Trump's travel ban for Syrian refugees and citizens of six other predominantly Muslim countries; the Justice Department quickly appealed the judge's order. Cara said her roommates are very concerned. Neither have been directly affected by the ban, but they wonder which countries will be next.

Offering shelter and support can prove complicated when authorities are involved, said Rev. Babs Miller, a minister at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, part of the Austin Sanctuary Network. Since early 2016, St. Andrew's has housed Hilda Ramirez and her son Ivan, a Guatemalan family fleeing death threats and domestic violence. Both held deportation orders that have recently been paused. "We said we wanted to support them and that we were willing to offer sanctuary," Miller recalled. "We said that having no idea what it really meant."

Doing so meant that both the family and the church would incur risk: A 2011 policy memo names "sensitive locations" that ICE will not enter, including churches, schools, and hospitals. But memos can change at the whim of the executive branch - a scarv thought under the current administration. Federal authorities have also found workarounds. Reynold Garcia, a Mexican national who had been deported once before, was allegedly lured from a church service in southern Illinois by texts from ICE agents posing as his cousin.

Though many faith communities have offered support to undocumented immigrants, not every house of worship has the resolve or resources to house those fighting their deportation orders in court. St. Andrew's congregants asked themselves what a family in hiding might need. The ministers called for donations; clothing and furniture poured in. Volunteer tutors arrived for both mother and son. When the church threw Ivan a birthday party, residents from the nearby apartment complex brought cakes. The boy's eyes were big, Miller recalled: He'd never had a party, let alone a bouncy castle.

There was also the day-to-day of sanctuary, full of unexpected hang-ups. The sink installed in the converted Sunday school classroom was too high for the tiny woman and boy to reach. The church began to lock its doors. As time passed, Miller said, "the church community gained a great deal more understanding of the immigration system." She spread her hands across the table where she sits, her fingers stretching wide. "You start doing justice work in one area, and it just grows."

### **SANCTUARY AS RESISTANCE**

As Trump's crackdown on immigration unfolds, the Austin Sanctuary Network has seen requests for sanctuary increase. There may come a day, Miller said, when there is "no room at the inn." Besides, no city or even state can restrict federal authorities

from arresting noncitizens - regardless of local law enforcement's cooperation. So they have begun to expand their tactics: Sanctuary in the Streets, a newly formed group modeled after one of the same name in Philadelphia, stands ready to erect its own kind of wall in Austin: a barrier of people willing to stand between immigrants and ICE.

The network of immigrant advocates, attorneys and faith groups is now 150 people strong and growing. New volunteers assembled for a training session in early January at St. Andrew's. "Policy has never saved us," said Alejandro Caceres, an organizer with Grassroots Leadership, who spoke before a large group of Sanctuary in the Streets trainees. Behind him stood an easel marked er stands nearby and films. "We have been notified that there is a situation to be observed. May I see your warrant please?"

In training sessions, Miller often plays the role of immigration officer. Sometimes she plays good cop; sometimes she is less lenient. "Does your husband know that you're doing this?" she'll ask one of the role-players, trying to rattle them. She wants to prepare volunteers - mostly white U.S. citizens – for an experience many have never had. "They don't live in a world where cops and immigration officers are confrontational and abusive toward them," said Miller. "I'm trying to help them understand it won't be like, 'Did you realize your blinkers are out, sir?""

up with promises from Trump's campaign: Build a wall. Muslim registry. Deport 11 million. Punish sanctuary cities. "We have to rely on ourselves," said Caceres.

"Sanctuary is not passive," he said during a later interview. "Sanctuary is active. We're struggling, we're fighting alongside you. We're saying, 'This person's life matters more to me than the law.' ... It's an act

Sanctuary in the Streets does not intend to wait for people to come asking for sanctuary. Rather, the organization aims to disrupt future raids. Rev. Miller told the Chronicle the group practices this scenario: An undocumented immigrant refuses to let an ICE agent into her home without a warrant: she calls a hotline (512/270-1515) that sends a small group of volunteers to the scene. Politely and silently, three or four people edge between the agent and the door, standing shoulder to shoulder. Only one speaks. "We are trained and certified immigration observers," the volunteer will say, as anoth-

The volunteers must decide what to do if the agent threatens to arrest them, said Miller. Do they stand aside? Or do they stay put, and force the immigration official, who lacks the authority to arrest U.S. citizens, to call for police assistance? "We are using our white privilege to slow down the process," Miller said, noting that it doubles as an effort to buy time for reporters to arrive.

"Enforcement officers do not like media coverage," said Miller.

The reverend stressed that Sanctuary in the Streets' methods are nonviolent, though they are confrontational. "You can play nice and still go after the abuse of power," she said.

Sanctuary in the Streets may be the closest Austin has come to the spirit of the Eighties' Sanctuary Movement, which embraced civil disobedience. Then, the network of churches, synagogues, and safe houses stretched from Mexico to Arizona to Canada, sheltering and transporting roughly 1 million refugees. In Texas, sanctuary workers drove to the border to pick up Central Americans fleeing civil wars and genocides that activists accused the United States of fomenting. Informants infiltrated their network, stoking division and paranoia. Eighteen people - including nuns, priests, and a minister - were jailed and indicted for smuggling aliens.

Miller is hopeful that today's circumstances won't reach that point. Immigrants in 2017 have more grassroots support, she said. The Eighties movement came before the internet and was more isolated. The shift toward a more resistant strand of sanctuary is a result of that effort. "We're standing on their shoulders," Miller said.

When Sulma Franco declared sanctuary in the Unitarian church, she was not wellversed in this history. She calls her stay a mistake-filled learning process. But while the declaration was a cry for help, it was also a show of strength. With the help of her girlfriend and UT students, Franco built the chain-link fence that surrounded her church living quarters. "I wanted to show other women that we don't have to be scared all the time, that we can do something to defend ourselves."

Hilda Ramirez and her son followed Franco's lead. Though 28, Ramirez appears younger, with round cheeks and a quiet. measured way of speaking Spanish. Mam, an indigenous language, is her native

Ramirez was fearful when she first came to St. Andrew's. She jumped at small noises and anxiously watched the sheriff's patrol cars that were camped outside, knowing their presence was routine but still unable to shake the feeling that sheriff's deputies were watching her. Having spent 11 months in a family detention center with her son just seven months before that, she felt terribly sad to be confined again - even in a kind place like St. Andrew's. During her first week, Ramirez recalled, pastors asked if she wanted to meet the congregation. Ramirez said no. "I stayed in my room," she said, pulling her arms close as if clutching a blanket. The second Sunday, she was ready to meet the church.

Rev. Miller believes Ramirez's arrival made it clear to the congregants what was at stake with sanctuary. "What will you do if Immigration comes?" Caceres asked the churchgoers. He pretended to be an ICE officer. "We're here for Hilda Ramirez," he called out into the church.

The members began to move. Ramirez suddenly found herself in a circle deep with people. Some blocked the doorway. Others formed an outer ring. More pushed closer, she recalled, linking elbows together, saying to her, "We're not going to let them take you. You're safe."

"I'd felt so alone," Ramirez said, her slowmoving Spanish suddenly picking up pace, animating. "And now there was everyone, who'd come to protect me without even knowing me. All, all of the church! I'm so small - all I could see was their backs. I felt so much joy. I was crying. There I was made invincible."

## As I Lay Purring

THE BOOKSTORE CAT IS ALIVE AND WELL AND SPRAWLED ACROSS THE BOOK YOU WANT TO READ AT DRAGON'S LAIR

Readers can be capricious creatures. We take a long time getting settled in just the right place - do we want to sunbathe, or is the natural light too bright on the page? Trust is hard to build - picking a novel is a commitment of time, a definitive choice of this book above the millions of others that could consume your time. We preen, with our Goodreads reviews and bookshelves organized by author or subject or color, but our practice makes us essentially solitary. At the end of the day, we want to curl up with a good book.

If this character portrait strikes you as a tad feline, it's because I believe that the symbiosis that occurs between so many cats and book-lovers is something we come by naturally. How else to demystify our continuing tradition of bookstore cats? While diverse business owners may have employed cats as pest preventatives in ages past, the rise in health codes drove most entrepreneurial rat catchers into retirement. But look up "bookstore cat" and you're greeted by listicle upon listicle compiling Instagrams of the most famous felines, lounging upon display tables or daring a patron to unseat them from a velveteen chair.

Austin's impressive array of independent booksellers might make one a little peeved that no local entries appear in the major roundups. Surprisingly, most of our literary purveyors don't have pet companions of any kind. Susan Post of BookWoman attributes their lack of a furry friend to the combination of being short on time and a fundamental disinterest in cleaning a litter box (fair enough). Schandra Madha of Malvern Books is one of many animal-loving staff members, but notes that their space isn't quite right for a permanent pet. Everyone happily accommodates service animals, and, in the case of Austin Books & Comics, all store-trained dogs are encouraged to give them a visit for the chance for your pup to become their Dog Visitor of the Month. But no canines take up official residence inside.

Only one local establishment embraces the cultural tradition of the bookstore cat - Dragon's Lair Comics





its 31st year and newest location on West Anderson Lane, has had feline friends since its inception. For 18 years, Aswan ruled the store, riding around on customers' shoul-

ders and making herself at home on any surface available. She passed away in September 2014, and remains greatly missed and remembered fondly by staff.

The store wasn't left without a feline guardian, however. Before Aswan's departure, she had been joined by Mai Dez, a particularly fluffy calico who simply walked into the store as a kitten and

refused to leave. Without any sign of a collar or tags, and determined by everyone to be feral, the team adopted Mai Dez, now approximated to be 8 or 9 years old. Not wanting Mai Dez to be forced into a solitary existence, the team started keeping an ear to the ground for opportunities to adopt, according to PR and facilities manager Greg Burrow. Fate beckoned when the store owner's sister rescued a cat that had been locked in an abandoned house for two weeks without food. Abbey (also a calico, though with slightly less fluff) arrived at the store in January 2015, skinny as a rail and in need of lots of love. She made a full recovery under the watchful eye of the Dragon's Lair team, though Burrow notes that she never quite forgot her starvation experience and tends to bolt down her food.

Like more bookstore cats, they're not particularly helpful employees - they knock over displays on occasion, are more than happy to lay down on the book you most want to read, and will shamelessly beg patrons for scraps of food (though the store strictly prohibits feeding them). But we can't quite condemn that laissez-faire attitude. It's a selfportrait, after all. Pets grow to be like their owners, and vice versa, and when the human's a reader, neither party has to change much. - Rosalind Faires

# Mr. Smarty Pets Knows

In 1985, Canadian Keith Connell first introduced Vietnamese potbellied pigs to North America. Originally, he intended to supply them only to zoos. The following year, the first potbellies were sold in the U.S.

According to *Bird Talk* magazine, Florida, California, and Texas are the three top states for bird ownership.



The American Pet Products Association estimates about 37-47% of U.S. households have a dog and 30-37% have a cat. They also estimate 70-80 million dogs and 74-96 million cats are owned in the U.S.

According to a 2002 study by researchers at the State University of New York at Buffalo, people with pets had significantly lower heart rate and blood pressure levels during a resting baseline.

A 10-year study by researchers at the University of Minnesota's Stroke Institute in Minneapolis showed that owning a cat could reduce your risk of a heart attack by nearly one third.

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals recommends a daily diet for pet rabbits should consist of fresh clean water; a bundle of hay that's about as big as the rabbit; grazing grass (not lawnmower clippings); an adult-sized handful of leafy green vegetables, herbs, and weeds; an eggcup's worth of pellets per kilogram of body weight; and carrots/apples for treats.

When ferrets are happy or excited, they make a clucking sound called "dooking."

A 2004 study by researchers at the University of Wisconsin-Madison found exposure to dogs in infancy, especially around the time of birth, can help children's immune development while reducing the probability of certain allergic diseases.

Never feed avocados, bananas, bean sprouts, peas, green beans, or brussels sprouts to a tortoise.

According to estimates by the American Veterinary Medical According to estimates by the American Veternary Reducal Association, 877,000 U.S. households include pet hamsters, while 847,000 include pet guinea pigs. However, it also estimates there are more pet guinea pigs (1.4 million) than there are pet hamsters (1.1 million).

Reptiles magazine says the ball python is the most popular pet snake. Breeders say they are also the friendliest and most easygoing snake species.

A study at University of Pennsylvania found that when dental patients saw fish tanks before treatment, they were less anxious. A study at Purdue University found tanks of brightly colored fish curtail disruptive behaviors and improve eating habits of people with Alzheimer's disease.

Twenty-six states have a ban on primate ownership, while 11 states (including Texas) require some sort of permit, and 13 have no restriction.

## It's a Dog Meet Dog World

### BARKHAPPY APP CONNECTS PUPS FOR PLAYTIME

Our digital age makes many human social activities more convenient than ever before. Accepting invitations to parties, sending messages to friends, and finding a potential date requires a mere click, swipe, or keystroke. But up until recently, we humans have been hogging the power of this technology all to ourselves.

Ninis Samuel thought it was about time someone let man's best friend in on the social media craze. He created an app specifically for dogs and their owners called BarkHappy, launching it in Austin as a start-up in January 2015. The idea for the service came from problems Samuel ran into trying to go places with his dog Kerbey.

"What I realized as a dog owner is that it's so hard to find dog-friendly places." Samuel said. "There were really no good websites or apps out there that were giving the right kind of information that I needed."

Samuel set about fixing this problem by letting BarkHappy users add dog-friendly locations to an interactive map, as well as the caninespecific amenities these places provide, such as patios, water bowls, and treats. The map is constantly updated with fresh locations and tips by diligent dog lovers.

The app features profiles for dog and owner, allowing for information such as the dog's preferred type of playmate and times available

to play to be displayed. Users send "wags" to other dogs (think Facebook-style pokes), find and message dogs to meet up with in the area, and even create special dog play events. For Brooke, a BarkHappy user who sent a wag

to Chronicle mascot Hank, it's this social aspect of the app that her 4-year-old mixed breed, Riggs, has enjoyed the most.

"It's nice to network with like-minded dog people," Brooke said. "But more importantly, Riggs has found some real buddies through the app. When you find a dog who meshes well and tires your active dog out, it's priceless."

Samuel, a UT grad, decided to launch BarkHappy in Austin because of the city's outdoor lifestyle and reputation for being dog-friendly and tech-forward.

"The people of Austin are super welcoming," Samuel said. "They're really great when it comes to new technology, great at supporting new start-ups and giving feedback, and there's a culture here that welcomes this sort of thing."

2016, the app became available nationwide. BarkHappy now boasts over 60,000 users and listings for over 27,000 dog-friendly places and businesses.

BarkHappy continues to grow thanks to frequent charity events geared toward humans and dogs as a pair, such as bar crawls and fitness classes. These events raise money to benefit local animal shelters as well as promote the BarkHappy brand to potential new users. Twenty-two of these events took place across the country in January alone.

For Samuel and the BarkHappy team. their current plan is to continue to increase their install base and the scope of their charity events, as well as to keep fine-tuning the app and its reach. If they play their cards right, they may be able to throw the rest of the world a bone. - Tucker Whatley

Even pets that are snakes or lizards or turtles or other such reptiles: Noobs, I'm telling you. Tyros. Still-wet-behind-the-ears punks.

Note: Yes, citizen, I'm aware that reptiles don't have actual ears. Do please reach across the aisle and work with me here in metaphoristan, mmmkay?

Go ahead, look at the adorable mammals

in this issue. I mean, look at them again, sure, because by the time you get around to reading this article you've already paused for a longer peep at all those cute and cuddly varmints that make you go, like, awwwwwww, like the big old softie you are, regardless of those spiked studs in your leather jacket.

As I said: bunch of goddamn newcomers. My type of pets were on this planet for hundreds of millions of years before your Bowser or your Mittens or your what was it? Nigel? - before any of them even thought about differentiating from the scaly, lumbering cynodonts of the early Triassic period. And way before the cynodonts themselves existed.

My pets, as Old-School as Old-School can be while still retaining a semblance of petworthy infrastructure, are a Grammostola rosea tarantula and a Hadogenes troglodytes scorpion.

Generally speaking, New World tarantulas are pretty chill, while the Old Worlders hew to a slightly more might-just-have-to-fuck-you-up sort of vibe.

I mean, seriously? Belvedere? Luluwa? C'mon. If either of my pets were a deadly threat to human existence, I would have named them Donald or Trump.

## **Finding More** Than Nemo

HIEP HONG'S AWARD-WINNING AQUASCAPES ARE WORTHY OF THE GREATEST TANKS

All of Hiep Hong's best creations are covered in water

But that's not a bug, as the techies say, that's a feature: Hong, a once and future Austinite currently working out of Houston, is an aquaculture artist, a man who wreaks beauty and practical living quarters for fish

and such out of rocks and plants and other natural materials

But a lot of people do that, right? How else does the fishy section of your local pet emporium stay in business?

Sure, but not everybody takes their talent and industry in creating such things to enter into the annual competition known as the International Aquatic Plants Layout Contest.

In last year's IAPLC there were more participants than ever - 2,336 entries from 68 countries and areas - and Hong's Aqueous Reflection was ranked 116 out of all those. And the tricky thing is, those aquatic plants? They're not fake aquatic plants made out of plastic or fabric or anything like that. They're not even regular plants that have been submerged for as long as they'll last that way. No, these are naturally occurring underwater plants that have been raised in a tank in order to create fish-friendly and aesthetically compelling environments.

And how does a person get involved in a field like this?

"I started out by browsing a lot of online forums related to aquariums," says Hong. "Nowadays, forum activity has died down significantly and Facebook groups are seeing the most traffic and activity - so I'd start by looking at any aquarium/aquascapingrelated groups there."

And then it's all about the fish, right? You get yourself a few neon tetras or a couple of ruby swordtails, and then -

"Actually," says Hong, "I find that a great starter in the hobby currently are not fish, but dwarf shrimp. They're all the rage online and in aquarium shops now. Most breeds in the *Neocaridina* genus of shrimp are very colorful and attractive. They're hardy, too, and breed quite easily - all traits


that make them very popular and attractive

"But I think an equally great idea for a beginner," he continues, "is to visit local shops and just look around for a fish or whatever other aquatic creature that really fascinates them, then go home and do all the research to find out what's necessary to keep that fish. There's nothing quite like seeing it right before your eyes to inspire you to dig in and learn about the creature. Learning about the plants and animals is a part of the hobby that I find incredibly gratifying and enjoyable."


While Hong, who could ply his trade pretty much anywhere, chooses to remain in the Lone Star State because he's got family in Austin and is currently finishing up his last semester at the University of Houston, another reason for staying is also related to aquascaping.

"Two of the most famous aquascapers in the U.S. - brothers Mike and Jeff Senske, owners of Aquarium Design Group - live here in Houston," says Hong, "and I've built a very close relationship with both of them these past four years. Being around the Senske brothers and learning from them have played a major role in my success as an aquascaper."

And when I thank the talented young man for his time, his face brightens with the smile of a true enthusiast. "One of my biggest missions," says Hong, "is to expand the hobby." - Wayne Alan Brenner





Surgery on a 16-year-old Japanese girl, reported in January by New Scientist, revealed that her ovary contained a miniature skull and brain. Doctors say that finding rogue brain cells in ovaries is not that uncommon, but that an already organized brain, capable of transmitting electric impulses, is almost unheard of.

### Work of a Researcher

"Field work is always challenging," explained Courtney Marneweck of South Africa's University of KwaZulu-Natal in a recent journal article, but studying the sociology of a white rhino's dung meant developing a "pattern-recognition algorithm" to figure out "smell profiles" of 150 animals' feces - after tracking them individually to observe them in the act. Wrote Marneweck, "I think my record for waiting for a rhino to poo was 7½ hours." Conclusion: Rhinos use feces to send distinct social signals on genetically compatible herds, mating access and predator dangers. (Or, in the Los Angeles Times "clickbait" version of the story, rhino dung "has a lot in common with a Facebook post.")

### The Way the World Works

"Retiring" the Herd: Settlement of a classaction lawsuit against a group of dairy co-ops was announced in January with milk producers agreeing to pay \$52 million on charges they had conspired to fix the dairy supply for years to get top-dollar prices. Among the producers' primary tactics, allegedly, was using what the industry calls "herd retirement," which is "retirement" only in the sense that 500,000 healthy young cows were slaughtered - just to drive up prices by eliminating otherwise-available milk. The \$52 million will be for consumers in 15 states and Washington, D.C.

Wrist-Slapping: 1) Rutgers University Athletic Director Pat Hobbs, responding to the NCAA's announcement of violations against the school's sports programs (including failure to penalize 16 football players who tested positive for drugs), told the Asbury Park Press in January that he would immediately dismiss

from teams any player testing positive for hard drugs - upon the fourth violation (if for marijuana only, upon the fifth). 2) In January, the Russian Parliament voted 380 to 3 to amend its assault law to allow a spouse one punishment-by-"ticketing" (i.e., not criminal) for domestic violence against his partner - provided the bodily harm was not "substantial" and that it happens no more than once a year.

### **Unclear on the Concept**

The "Virtuous Pedophile": Gary Gibson, 65, of Chiloquin, Ore., admits he is sexually attracted to little girls but never acts on his urges, and therefore, demands that people get off his case. He formed the Association for Sexual Abuse Prevention, campaigning, he says, to keep children safe from other pedophiles whose self-restraint may not match his. Gibson describes himself as a "normal, everyday person," married to a British nurse (whom he met via a Christian singles organization), and has three children and 10 grandchildren - none so far molested (though in an interview, London's The Sun allowed him to explain his side of various edgy events of his life, such as his having moved for a while to the South Pacific, where little girls sometimes played naked).

### **Leading Economic Indicator**

Donut lovers have legitimately mused for years how U.S. law could condemn, say, marijuana, yet permit Krispy Kreme to openly sell its seemingly addictive sugary delights on America's streets, Sonia Garcia, 51, realized a while back that residents of Ciudad Juárez, Mexico, so much needed Krispy Kreme fixes that she earns a handsome living running a black market from El Paso, Texas, bringing in 40 boxes at a time and reselling from the

trunk of her car at a 60% markup, pointing out to a Los Angeles Times reporter in January that her trafficking has already put one son through engineering school. (Mexico City now has Krispy Kremes, but apparently the company's distribution system cannot yet vanquish Sonia Garcia's car.)

# **Can't Possibly Be True**

Reporting from Mbyo, Rwanda, in January on the success of a "reconciliation" program following the country's bloody genocidal wars, London's The Guardian found, for example, Laurencia Niyogira living peacefully and forgivingly alongside neighbor Tasian Nkundiye even though, 22 years ago, Nkundiye murdered Niyogira's entire family (except for her and her siblings, left barely alive). (Over a 100-day span in 1994, 800,000 ethnic Tutsis were systematically slaughtered by Hutus.) A survey by the country's National Unity and Reconciliation Commission showed that 92.5% of Rwandans have come to accept reconciliation.

## **Least Competent Criminals**

Driver Joshua Concepcion-West, 27, was arrested in Apopka, Fla., with an ingenious license plate cover that he could raise and lower remotely from his key chain (thus avoiding identification by cameras as he passed through turnpike checkpoints). On Jan. 11 at a \$1.25 toll plaza, he had neglected to check his rearview mirror before lowering the cover - and failed to notice that right behind him was a Florida Highway Patrol car with a trooper watching the whole thing.

Lamest Criminal Defense Ever: Substitute teacher Pete Garcia Hernandez, 49, was arrested in Houston in January and charged with three counts of indecency with a child, involving girls at Looscan Elementary School. The girls had reported earlier that Hernandez had kissed them each on the mouth, but police investigators quoted Hernandez as calling it all an "accident," that "he was speaking close with them and his tongue accidentally went into their mouth[s]."




Right to Be Grumpy: Trader Joe's has gained popularity among grocery shoppers in large part by having relentlessly sunny employees, but now that the firm has expanded from mellower California to more brusque New York City, it is learning that cheerfulness is harder to find. The company fired Thomas Nagle recently because, though he said he frequently smiled, he was told his smile was insufficiently "genuine," and, backed by several colleagues, he has filed an unfair labor practice charge (and union organizers have taken notice). The National Labor Relations Board has already ruled (against another employer) that workers cannot be forced to convey that all-important "positive work environment" because they are entitled to have grievances.

# An Idiot at FronteraFest

Diary of getting a homegrown 25-minute play onstage for Austin's biggest annual performance festival

Full disclosure: I can be an idiot sometimes. I make rash decisions, I procrastinate like you wouldn't believe, and I have ideas that turn out terribly. All of this was proven thoroughly as I prepared a 25-minute piece for the 2017 edition of FronteraFest, the annual performance event at Hyde Park Theatre. Here's a diary of that experience.

May 12: An artist I've worked with in the past – we'll call her Rococo – emails me asking if I'd like to do something at FronteraFest 2017. I happen to have a short two-person play I've been wanting to workshop, so I'm all, "Sure!" I'm only working part time, so I have time to make it happen. I ask my rideor-die bestie (henceforth called Sassafras) to play the other role, and she says yes.

Oct. 28: I have not thought about FronteraFest in months when I get an email from Rococo: "Just making sure you're still doing this." I confirm. Though my part-time gig has blossomed into a temporary full-time gig, I'm still certain I can pull it all off.

**Dec. 5:** Sassafras and I do a quick readthrough of the play, which takes place in a trailer park at dusk. I want to build an RV with a door – which I think I can do with a white canvas wardrobe model from IKEA. I'll use Christmas lights to create constellations inside the RV, and as the sun sets in the show, the stars will literally come out. I'm confident I will have time to make all of this happen, because my temporary fulltime gig should be ending in the next week.

**Dec. 6:** My temporary full-time gig is offered to me as a permanent full-time gig, and I accept. It'll be a little crazy, but I still feel confident I can pull this off. Maybe.

**Dec. 18-Jan. 16:** I am settling in at my job, which is eating up a lot of time. There's also holiday madness, including but not limited to an epic road trip, way too much food, and a goat farm. Sassafras and I have yet to rehearse, but I'm sure it's going to be fine.

**Jan. 19:** First rehearsal. I reiterate my IKEA wardrobe RV idea. I'm certain I can engineer it to work and it'll be spectacular. We will do the build the night before tech.

**Jan. 24:** I am starting to panic about the show. I feel I may be in way over my head. I call my friend Brianna almost in tears.

"I'm an idiot," I say.

"No, you're not," Brianna shoots back.

"I've done a lot of stupid things."

"Lynn, you don't have to be an idiot to do stupid things."

"Thanks. Fair warning. I'm writing about this. I might reference our conversation."

"Cool," says Brianna. "Call me something good, like Brianna or Tianna."

"I will," I say. I am still uneasy.

**Jan. 27:** The night before tech. I head to Sassafras' house to pull an all-night rehearsal/set build/prop fabricationpalooza. The living room looks like the scene of a tent murder – poles and nylon everywhere. I now realize I had an incredibly poor idea.

Instead of rehearsing, we end up catching up, knocking back some whiskey, and ordering 40 hot wings. We talk and laugh late into the night. We fall asleep upstairs in the loft, because something has died in the walls of Sassafras' master bedroom – resulting in a trench foot-like stank.

**Jan. 28:** In the morning, we rehearse, scrape together one last set idea (a thin wooden board wrapped in Christmas lights and hung with paper background), then run to the dollar store for last-minute props.

In the theatre lobby, I'm hastily throwing on my costume when Sassafras gasps.

"What?" I say.

"Oh, shit," Sassafras whispers. "I forgot

My heart stops.

"The sound cues? Fucking really?"

"Nope, it's right here." Sassafras giggles. "Gotcha."

We show the stagehands the piece of wood and ask if they can duct tape it to the wall. They say they can only use painter's tape. We try to stick the board to the wall with painter's tape. It doesn't work. So we scrap our set. We set light and sound cues and run the show as best we can. I try to stay present, but all I can think is how I've ruined our set because I'm an idiot.

Back at Sassafras' place, I am mortified to do the piece on a blank stage. I tell Pete, Sassafras' husband, that I need a way to indicate a trailer park without trailer-like objects onstage. He suggests a sign for an RV park. I am stunned by his brilliance.



**Jan. 30:** I wake up with a fever, and I'm sore and exhausted. I call in sick to work. I cancel rehearsal.

**Jan. 31:** I am sweating and shivering, I'm running a fever, and I can't sleep enough. I call in sick again. I cancel rehearsal again.

**Feb. 1:** I'm still shaky and sweaty. I call in sick. I ask Sassafras if she can come over so we can at least run lines. She says she can't stand up for more than 10 minutes without breaking into a sweat. We cancel rehearsal.

Rococo asks for a blurb for publicity. I text her a short synopsis. She texts back: "Are you spelling it Madea on purpose?"

I try to text back, "No, it's Medea," but autocorrect changes it to Madea right in front of my eyes. I try again, and the same thing happens. "OMG AUTOCORRECT IS CHANGING IT." I text back.

Rococo sends a "laughing so hard I'm crying" emoji. Medea is the Greek immortal my play is about, and Madea is a Tyler Perry character. This could cause mass confusion.

**Feb. 2:** The day before production. I go to work, and even though I'm only running at 50%, it's good to be back. Sassafras makes it over around 6pm. She grabs my idea book and starts sketching out the sign, which is now pretty much our entire set.

"That's my idea book," I say.
"Yeah?"

"Yeah. It's only for ideas. Don't draw dicks in it or anything."

We run lines as Sassafras sketches. When we're done, I look down at my idea book, and she's drawn a pretty cool logo – right next to a dick. We finish the sign, run the show a few more times, then call it a night.

**Feb. 3:** Day of production: I go to work, which takes my mind off the show, then go to Sassafras' place. We run lines, then pile everything into Sassafras' car and set out for the theatre. We get there early, so we go across the street to the pizza joint.


We walk back to the theatre and go to the green room – really a little patio in the back.


It's cold out, but we have jackets and comfy chairs. We sit, quietly whispering our lines. We meet the three women going on before us and immediately fall in love with them. They are warm and funny, and we talk and laugh with them until the lineup starts. Then we go back to our whisper-through.

At last, it's go time. Sassafras and I are both jittery, but I'm so excited to be doing this. We give each other a hug, then I walk around the outside of the theatre to stage right. I make my entrance. We do the show. It feels really good until our sound cue (softly chirping cicadas) jumps to the "oohs" from KC & the Sunshine Band's 1975 pop hit "That's the Way (I Like It)." We pretend not to notice. When the cicadas come back, Sassafras takes a perfect beat before restarting the scene. "She's so damn good," I think. We finish the show smooth as silk, take our bows, and walk off together. Out front, I hug my mom, who drove over an hour to see my piece. I spend more time at the pizza joint with Sassafras and Pete and some other folks. While we're out, we get the news that our show has made "Best of Week," so we'll get to perform it again on Saturday. We celebrate a little longer, then I make my way home - and to bed. I'm spent, but I haven't felt this good in weeks. I fall asleep smiling.

I feel so lucky to be a part of FronteraFest. For less than the cost of dinner for two, anyone can get 25 minutes on one of the linchpin stages in Austin to present whatever they want. FronteraFest gave me the space to dream as big as I could – and fail a little. It forced me to distill everything to its theatrical essence, to what was truly necessary to tell the story I wanted to tell. And I was obliged to see the experiment through to its end. I made mistakes, sure, but I had the support and smarts of my scene partner to cancel out my occasional idiocy, and together, with a little magic, we pulled it off.



Even by the unconventional standards of line upon line percussion, the first piece in first – the second concert of the trio's fourth season – was ... surprising. Different. Unusual. I mean, musicians Adam Bedell, Cullen Faulk, and Matthew Teodori have previously engaged in such offbeat exercises as performing in a creekbed under a bridge, using bicycle parts as instruments, mak-

ing music with water, but here the three had clipped themselves to ropes that rose to the top of a concrete column in the Big Medium Gallery. And they weren't just

moving their arms the way they do in most of the pieces they perform; they were moving their whole bodies, walking through the space winding the ropes around themselves and making sounds – slapping their chests, clapping their hands in front of their open mouths, stamping their feet, softly repeating a few set phrases – as they reached parts of the ropes with specially placed knots. Composer Claudia Molitor had created "a tactile score," and the line upon line-men were reading it with their fingers, the knots telling them what sounds to make. Program notes likened these living, breathing, mobile percussion instruments to spiders spinning

the score through space and entangling one another in their respective sounds, but with the hushed quality of the sounds, the long stretches of silence spun out between

> them, the dimness of the highceilinged room with Natalie George's ropes of light winding across the floor like bioluminescent trails, the performers stepping gingerly through the space, and, of course, the ropes

> > connecting them, the trio also suggested a team of spelunkers venturing through a vast unexplored cavern. The sounds, small and spread out, became a

way for them to navigate the great unknown quietude around them, a tool for mapping the expanse. After a while, the silence seemed to acquire its own physical presence and rhythm to which the delicate sounds worked as counterpoint. And somewhere in it, you could imagine the shade of John Cage soundlessly applauding these intrepid explorers.

The notion of Teodori, Faulk, and Bedell as explorers isn't exactly original – their "Best of Austin" Critics Pick in 2012 called them "explorers in the realm of rhythm and aural texture, constantly searching for new and challenging music they can play" – but it bears repeating after a program like first,



which featured four new works, every one of them experimental and boundary-pushing in some aspect. In addition to Molitor's tactile composition Entangled, Brett Kroening's alchemy test used an array of traditional and nontraditional instruments (a vibraphone, a snare drum, a cymbal, crystal glasses, coins) in an aural analog of the medieval process of transmutation; Pablo Vergara's Engraving on bronze called for the tips of drumsticks to be dragged across cymbals like needles on a vinyl record; and a new work by Southwestern University's Jason Hoogerhyde (getting an unofficial pre-premiere at first) positioned all three line upon line members around a single vibraphone. Rarely did the works resemble music in the conventional sense. Bows drawn along the edge of vibraphone keys created a sharp metallic keening, eerie yet compelling, and those drumstick tips on cymbals made long, unearthly screeching that might have been a door opening to the ancient tomb of some gruesome, ghastly beast. And the closest some of them came to recognizable

rhythms was the erratic cadences of bebop. Still, even at their harshest and most bizarre, these pieces held the fascination of discovery – catching a sound previously unheard, finding out where a new idea would take you.

Curiously, with all of the works in first, the strange new ideas took you to a settled. almost serene place. The competing sounds of alchemy test came across almost like a family squabble, noisy and insistent. Then with his wet finger circling the edge of a crystal glass, Teodori summoned a soothing belllike tone, and a coin spun on a suspended cymbal made a rattle so soft it sounded like sand being poured on a table. Likewise with Engraving on bronze, where those grating screeches of drumsticks on cymbals gave way to a mellowing gong. There will be periods when tension, discord, and clamor may envelop us, even assault us, the four compositions seemed to agree, but in time there will come a resolution that signals peace. A notion worth remembering in days like these. Thanks, line upon line.



# "KAREN KUNC + MONIKA MELER: PRINTAUSTIN 2017"

Karen Kunc's Flooding Field, Fountain Burst isn't an obvious illustration of anything. The undulating lines making the familiar arcs and points of stylized water are the only portion of the image that offer something concrete. This ambiguity turns out to be a strength. The color is rich with bright oranges and a variety of blues

that culminate in organic, ethereal forms. A dark iewel. like a hive or an alien gem, takes up the right side of the image. It's scary, like something powerful and teeming with magic. It feeds the brightness in the rest of the image, its darkness seeping like tentacles from the hive and between the brilliant orange curves that act like a landscape confining the placid water at the image's left. The print is lush, reciting a discrete story that is just out of reach.

Kunc's Zig Zag and Weathered Lattice are monoprints and wield the same abstraction that Flooding Field does. The forms in Zig Zag are sharp, geometric, with crisscrossing lines and sharp points. The background features a pattern like a wood surface, concentric rings growing elegantly from their circular hearts. The wood surface is repeated in Weathered Lattice, though Weathered Lattice takes the reference further than Zig Zag. It is populated with simple treelike shapes, their arms reaching out and touching amid circular forms that float like cells or amoebas. Kunc applies real skill with line, color, and composition, so that the complicated collections of shapes, rather than calamitous, feel easy and readily placed, natural.

Kunc's prints interact well with the work of Monika Meler, her partner in the show. Meler's three tower prints, for example, refer to man-made architecture, but they are not overtly industrial or urban. The predominant color is a soft blue; the "towers" themselves are not the vertical monoliths we might expect. Instead, they are squat, like

shuttlecocks. The show's text makes reference to the Chicago skyline. Having lived in Chicago, I can't say the softness of the tower pieces is too reminiscent of that city's force. That said, it would be foolish to impose my experience of Chicago onto Meler's. Anyway, upon reflection, I can recall rides on the EI train into the Loop, contemplating the distant skyline, like a city on a cloud. Meler's work takes me there, and that is a gift.

Another piece, Cities and Structure, is more reflective of that city's angular hodgepodge. Small, straightedged forms repeat over the entire surface, creating a netting that is reminiscent of the thousands of windows one finds glowing on the faces of tall buildings, until the structure bursts in multiple planes, and in all directions, off the edge of the print's surface. It's the busiest moment in a busy city, a corner where you realize you're lost, harried, while all around is constant movement and endless buildings that are different but the same, just like the people. Neither Kunc's nor Meler's images have people in them, by the way. They're not needed. The references to nature in Kunc's work imply the peace and abundance of the world beyond our reach, while Meler's urban myths highlight the agitation and scale of the human endeavor, raised to the limits of our imaginations, and of our control. Our own species finds itself in the middle somewhere, too chaotic and clumsy to smoothly commune with nature; too vulnerable and small to manage our machines. In the end, we're reminded that something has to give, and that something could be ourselves. - Sam Anderson-Ramos





The 8th Wonder Brewery in Houston is a neighborhood pub on steroids. They have a huge selection of house-made beers, it's a decent sports bar, and the partially covered biergarten is a rockin' music venue. This March the brewery celebrates its fourth anniversary. The music festivals that accompany the birthday parties have become legendary in Space City.

The brewery takes its name from the city's iconic former sports stadium. The seats out of the Astrodome in the biergarten are a great selfie spot.

It's not unusual for the craft brewer to have 15 or more beers on tap at one time. A big chalkboard at the entrance to the former warehouse announces what's available. The team is always experimenting with new batches; there is a rotation of seasonal favorites, and a solid selection of year-round brews complete the list.

I only sampled two styles: Brewston Pale Ale and Dome Faux'm Throwback Cream Ale. I liked the first one best. Other reviewers have given Rocket Fuel Vietnamese Coffee Porter high marks.

As you walk into the tap room, head to the bar to buy beer tokens. A really good deal is the flight of four pours and a beer token for \$8. Brewery tours are offered weekday evenings at 7pm.

The 8th Wonder Brewery is at 2202 Dallas St. on the east side of downtown Houston, with the skyscrapers forming a wall in the distance. It opens daily at 11am; more info at www.8thwonderbrew.com.

et's make one thing clear: For minorities in this country, the reaction to | Donald Trump's immigration ban is not an exercise in manufactured outrage. Many of us are terrified because it echoes the horror of this country's not-so-distant past of refusing to welcome Jewish refugees escaping Nazi Germany and holding thousands of Japanese-Americans in internment camps. This shit did not happen overnight - it took a collective of people to either support it or to stay silent for it to move forward. The remorseful vows of "never again" faded back into history as Trump stirred up hate, reminding us that we're not as socially evolved as we'd like to believe.

But this threat is really nothing new. And because of it, minority groups have taught their children to keep their heads down, work hard, and not rock the boat. Advice is passed on from generation to generation: You're too easy of a target so try to blend in as well as you can. Definitely don't get angry, even when that is the only sane reaction or when someone is directly challenging your humanity.

For Asian-Americans, the unspoken pressure to be the model minority is ingrained in our genes. While some subscribe to the cultural expectation to enter a handful of parentapproved professions, a small group of risktakers have always challenged this narrative. Austin's booming modern Asian dining trend is proof. Chinatown's Ronald Cheng paved the way in his signature eccentric fashion, followed by more recent restaurateurs like *Top Chef* winner Paul Qui and Wu Chow's self-proclaimed "giant Chinaman" C.K. Chin.

Now, Old Thousand (the name is Chinese slang for a cunning hustler or con) joins the ranks of trailblazers that are defining Austin's brand of rebellious Asian fare. And if the unapologetically displayed painting merging Trump's face with Mao Zedong is any indication, these Asians aren't about to bow with servitude. Chefs James Dumapit (Uchiko) and David Baek (Thai-Kun, Uchi) collaborate on a menu that hits the comfort notes that most diners seek in American-Chinese food. Decked with tattoos and an infectious smile. general manager Stephanie Chow runs the floor, expanding on the knowledge she gained from her family's six Chinese restaurants. Along with SMGB Hospitality Co., they have created a new template for what a Chinese restaurant can be.

The eclectic atmosphere blends familiar Chinese elements like Forties-style Shanghainese powder blue floral wallpaper and kitschy red lanterns with updated details like contemporary gold chairs. Cheeky humor dots the space, like the prominent painting of a giant panda dressed like Biggie Smalls. Similarly, the menu remixes elements from a range of regional Chinese dishes – some

restrained, others loud. Of the starters, the Chongqing chicken (\$8) and the tea egg salad (\$8.88) were standouts. The former is like a fancy, grownup version of popcorn chicken, the bite-size meat fried in batter, then tossed in an addictive Sichuan chili oil that gives a lip-numbing "málà" or "icy-hot" quality. The creamy tea-marinated quail eggs brought whimsy and umami to the bed of lightly dressed HausBar Farms bitter greens with crunchy radish slices, puffed rice, and edible flowers.

The pork ribs (\$8.88) in a black vinegar glaze were fall-off-the-bone tender and homey. They were boldly smoky and sweet, sprinkled with flaky salt and diced celery. The jellyfish salad (\$10)

scored high in both flavor (a vibrant málà vinaigrette) and textures (with three types of crunch from the jellyfish, cucumber, and wood ear mushroom). Unnoticeable to my tablemates, the slight grittiness was a rookie slipup.

Between the starches, the rice dishes take the crown. Thinly sliced Chinese sausage and chopped Micklethwait beef gave just the right amount of smoky oil to coat the brisket fried rice's springy granules (\$16). With plenty of wok-hei (breath of the wok)

and precise seasoning, they elevated this common Chinese-Texan way to repurpose barbecue. The vegetarian sunchoke fried rice (\$12) needed a touch more oil, but pickled sunchoke, sunflower sprouts, Chinese long beans, and sunchoke chips added refreshing textural interest. Meltingly tender pork belly, Chinese sausage, and duck confit brought a lavish modern twist to Cantonese claypot rice (\$24). They stirred in an egg yolk and chili soy sauce tableside for added richness, but

it was missing fan-jiu at the bottom, the quintessential crispy rice crust.

While the rice dishes were cooked beautifully, the noodles fell a bit flat. The dan dan noodles (\$10) with crispy tofu, bok choy, and

mushrooms, and cumin beef noodles (\$12) both packed a punch in flavor. The nutty garlic sauce with mushroom puree and creamy soft egg, and the fiery cumin sauce with marinated flank steak were each distinctly savory and impactful. However, the soft wheat noodles lacked texture and became even softer as they soaked up the sauces.

Restraint was key to the honey prawn (\$16) and mapo eggplant (\$10), which often tends to be over-sauced. Instead, the prawns

were lightly coated and expertly fried, then highlighted with a measured drizzle of citrusy Texas honey curd and the eggplant dressed in an earthy fermented chili bean paste. The same light-handed delivery would have benefited the pineapple beef (\$16), where the thick flour dusting on the beef and overly sweet sauce resulted in a slightly cloying dish, even if the charred pineapple added necessary brightness.

Char siu (\$18-34), which translates to "prong-grilled" in Cantonese, was a brilliant mash-up of Hong Kong-style barbecue pork served with Taiwanese-style gua bao (fluffy steamed buns), cilantro, and sliced onions. With an even fat-to-meat ratio, the red meat ring and crispy charred exterior were signifiers of skillful grilling.

With three desserts to choose from, the red bean paste-filled fried sesame balls (\$3) were a proper nod to traditional dim sum while the dan ta (\$6) took a far leap from the Cantonese bakery specialty. The silky, lemony egg custard was set nicely in the crispy tart shell, which was an unusual but reasonable substitute to the original flaky or crumbly crusts.

The flawed but promising cocktail program is in line with their rebellious ethos. The aptly named Nasty Woman (\$11) immediately caught the eye. Barbancourt 4-year-old rum, Cherry Heering, St. Germain, and Anaheim pepper gave the cava-topped drink balanced body and floral sweetness. The Bad Hombre (\$12) plays on the margarita with Wahaka espadín mezcal, Aperol, and Velvet Falernum bringing smokiness and complexity to the Sichuan salt-rimmed glass. Unfortunately, the maple syrup and tiki bitters overpowered Famous Grouse Smoky Black in the Scotchy, Scotch, Scotch (\$11), not allowing anything else to shine through.

Because of all the liquor flowing, the soundtrack of classic hip-hop anthems can overwhelm at times, but the noise seems inevitable in the densely packed dining room. The service was attentive and friendly, managing to juggle informing diners on the menu, weaving through heavy traffic areas, while ensuring that dishes arrived hot and the tea pots were topped up. But don't expect perfection here because that's not their focus. Rather than attempting to replicate upscale Chinese dining, the menu and ambience strives to conjure up nostalgic memories and to create dialogue. Their business reveals how originality and authenticity ultimately win diners' hearts.

And one more thing – take a minute to look around and you will see that the team is made up of all beautiful skin shades. America is great because immigrants have brought their best values, ideas, skills, cultures, and dreams to create a collective strength. But it's irresponsible, even unethical, to merely reap from immigrants' efforts without standing up for their constitutional rights. You cannot simultaneously ask for more culinary diversity while neglecting the personal security of the families that cook your food. Like the food at Old Thousand shows, minority groups will continue to rebel against stereotyping, false perception, and oppression. But the fight can be exhausting. Knowing that we're not fighting alone makes a world of difference. - Melody Fury

t's a beautiful January afternoon in Austin – maybe a bit warmer than usual – and people are waiting outside to eat lunch at Bouldin Creek Cafe. It's just another afternoon in South Austin. That is, until a man carrying a Donald Trump piñata walks up and the crowd bursts into spontaneous applause.

Later that evening, a line of patrons stretches out the door of the Aristocrat Lounge on Burnet Road. The bar is offering a list of perhaps pointedly named cocktails including the Suffering Bastard and the Wind Is a Very Deceiving Thing. There's not a place to sit, and the atmosphere is festive. "Drinking Helps," reads the menu, and, for a spell, it does indeed help to chase oblivion.

There's not usually an hourlong wait for lunch at Bouldin, nor is there usually a line outside the door of the Aristocrat. But the day in question was no ordinary day: It was January 20, 2017, and Donald Trump had just been sworn into office as the 45th president of the United States. While there was nothing anyone could do to prevent his inevitable swearing-in, establishments like Bouldin Creek and the Aristocrat did what they could to clap back at our new president, who many people view as a threat to civil liberties and democracy itself. They gave people the opportunity to speak with their dollars, and the response was deafening.

On that day, The Aristocrat raised \$1,000 each for the ACLU and the Southern Poverty Law Center, and \$3,000 for SafePlace. Bouldin raised \$3,000 divided between Planned Parenthood, the ACLU, and the SPLC. While Austin restaurants have long embraced the art of the fundraising dinner, the Trump Era has innervated and galvanized restaurateurs and diners both to push back against the values being codified by the autocrat and his right-wing regime.

The potential for Austin restaurants to economically culture-jam the values of Trump and his team of ideologues is considerable. In 2016, Americans spent more on dining out (\$54.8 billion) than on groceries (\$52.5 billion). Texas restaurants enjoyed \$42.6 billion in sales volume in 2014, second only to California; Texas also has one of the largest restaurant workforces in the country. The Austin dining industry is a powerful economic engine, with restaurants and bars generating nearly \$2 billion in economic activity and employing nearly 27,000 people.

What's more, many of today's sticky cultural issues intersect in the restaurant space, particularly those pertaining to race, gender, and immigration status. That intersection makes the potential for power and for change from within the Austin restaurant industry very real and very formidable.

Resistance comes in phases and waves. We form our values based on our individual experience. From there, we build like-minded communities and work within them to effect change. And then, when the shit hits the fan, those communities mobilize to take radical action for justice. Austin restaurant entrepreneurs are no exception to this process of galvanization.

One group of local restaurant and bar owners - Ashley Cheng of SPUN Ice Cream, Deepa Shridhar of Anjore, and Lindsey Peebles of Texas Keeper Cider - in the wake of the November election, organized the monthly Chix dinner series, geared toward gathering women together to "get together, have a good time, support good causes, and eat chicken." For a minimum \$3 donation to the appointed nonprofit, participants enjoy

everyone striking out at each other on social media, we thought we had a really special opportunity to get people together to talk face-to-face.'

The Jan. 28 Chix brunch raised more than \$1,000 for GirlForward, far surpassing the few hundred dollars raised at the first two Chix gatherings. The next gathering takes place on March 4, and will benefit the Anti-Defamation League of Texas.

How Austin restaurants are leading the Trump Era resistance

a collaborative meal served with locally made cider. They are encouraged to bring in-kind donations of tangible items requested by the nonprofit beneficiaries, which have to date included Girlstart, Planned Parenthood, and GirlForward, which supports refugee youth in the Austin area.

"We were already in talks to start this series, but the day after the election, we realized that we are in this very special position, being in the restaurant industry, to build community," says Cheng. "We're not creating a political series; it's genuinely open to all genders and all ages and we definitely want to create a conversation around different issues every month. With

While raising funds for worthy causes is definitely a plus, the higher purpose of the Chix dinner/brunch series is to serve as a gateway to community interaction and involvement. "I think one really cool thing that's happened from this election is that it's lit this fire in people around social justice and activism," Cheng says. "People feel called to use their skills to use what they have to do something or create something. They feel a call to action or a yearning to be a part of something bigger."

Others choosing the "radical action" path include the upscale Italian restaurant L'oca d'oro, located in the burgeoning Mueller development. While chef Fiore Tedesco and

general manager Adam Orman aren't shimmying up construction cranes to amplify their message, they are staking their business on their ethics. First, Orman and Tedesco added L'oca d'oro to the growing list of sanctuary restaurants across the country, which designates it as a "hate- and discrimination-free workplace," regardless of race, gender, sexuality, or immigration status. Then, they hosted March on the Kitchen on Jan. 25, a ticketed dinner featuring female chefs and beverage pros from respected local restaurants (including Susana Querejazu of Barley Swine, Abby Love of Dai Due, and sommelier Vilma Mazaite) to benefit SAFE Austin, a coalition of nonprofits dedicated to ending child abuse, domestic abuse, and sexual assault, as well as to codify their dedication to making women in the culinary industry feel safe, supported, and respected.

"Just being a good restaurant and nice people isn't enough," says Orman.

"It's worth noting that the concepts behind the sanctuary restaurant movement have been the foundation of what we do and how we do it, how we hire and train and treat our employees," says Tedesco.

"Is this a place where I'd want my daughter to work? It should be an easy 'yes' for any business," he continues. "That was an opening thesis, that if we were going to open a restaurant, we were going to do that with an ethic and a common morality."

March on the Kitchen, no doubt energized by the previous weekend's historic Women's March, sold out with more than 150 reservations, and raised more than \$10,000 for SAFE Austin. And while L'oca d'oro and Black Star Co-op are currently the only two sanctuary restaurants in Austin, Orman and Tedesco are hopeful that they are leading by example and can convince other operations to sign on.

"Participation is power. It doesn't do us any good to stand out alone," says Tedesco. "If everybody's doing this, if we equal the playing field, we make this a better environment across the board within the restaurants, then it's a better industry here. And then Austin can be a leading example throughout the country. But even just keeping it in Austin, we have the power to form a coalition as restaurants to have a voice with the City Council, to have a voice within the state. Two restaurants is not going to do it, no matter how loud we bark."


In Austin at least, there is evidence that resistance is building to a huge groundswell. King Bee and Rio Rita pledged a percentage of their Jan. 31 sales to Planned Parenthood, and Cenote pledged a portion of its Feb. 1 sales to the ACLU. Quack's donated brownies to a bake sale benefiting Planned Parenthood later that same week, and Nomad Bar lent its space to postcardwriting parties organized by a neighborhood activist. It's often said that the best way to make one's voice heard is by voting with one's wallet. More and more local restaurants and bars are giving Austinites the opportunity to put their dollars where their progressive ideals are. It's possible that the future of democracy may be as close as your next dinner out.

# The Block Knight **Rises**

Everything remains awesome in this superhero spinoff

Everything is Batman in this boisterously entertaining cousin of the awesome The LEGO Movie, which snuck under the radar three years ago to become a cultural phenomenon. Channeling D.C. Comics, Christopher Nolan, and campy Sixties television, The LEGO Batman Movie elevates Emmet Brickowski's sidekick in the original film to leading masked man in this fun-for-all follow-up that deconstructs the action hero's brooding vigilante persona, brick-by-brick. It's as if the Dark Knight somehow mated with the Caped Crusader, spawning a gravelvoiced bro-child (Arnett, brilliantly channeling Christian Bale) with relationship issues of every kind. (To quote the Man in Black,

"Batman doesn't do 'ships.") The movie also serves as an origin story introducing youthful ward Dick Grayson and spunky police commissioner Barbara Gordon (aka Robin and Batgirl, respectively) to flesh out the cadre

of Gotham City crime fighters who our loner hero eventually learns to rely upon in the name of teamwork. Even droll Alfred the butler gets in on the act to save the city, when he's not providing a winking running narrative on Batman cinematic mythology, (Observing his boss moping around once again, he



notes: "Sir, I have seen you go through similar phases in 2016 and 2012 and 2008 and 2005 and 1997 and 1995 and 1992 and 1989 and that weird one in 1966.") From the hilarious commentary on studio logos and ominous soundtracks as the movie begins, to the feel-good sing-along before

> the end credits roll, it's a rat-a-tattat animated comedy that rarely lets up, clever and silly and funny, and yes, a bit batty.

Where the 2014 feature film by Phil Lord and Christopher Miller sneakily posed the individuality-vs.-

conformity dilemma often faced by a Lego Master Builder ("To follow the instructions or not to follow the instructions: That is the question."), the titular interlocking plastic toy is only indirectly self-referenced here in an ab-crunching finale about the interconnectivity of us all. It's a brief shout-out, but one

sufficient to invoke the spirit of the building blocks upon which the film is assembled, though the original still reigns supreme in that respect. The LEGO Batman Movie looks a tad slick, appearing to abandon the mix of painstaking stop-motion and CG animation (plus actual Lego sets) that gave its predecessor a perfectly scruffy three-dimensional appearance, even without 3-D glasses. This visual flatness is distracting, but not enough to dampen the loony energy of a film that includes everyone from the Joker to Godzilla to Superman to Bane to the Eye of Sauron (and more!) in its good vs. evil, all-star cast. The future sure looks bright for the Lego movie franchise. As the Boy Wonder might say: "Holy Sequels, Batman! What next?"

# NEW REVIEWS

# **○** 2017 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT FILMS: ANIMATION

As befits their nominations for an Academy Award in the field of animation, the five chosen short films all boast some excellence in whichever style of animation - CG, woodcut, traditional cel - and storytelling they employ. All are representative of animators working at the top of their short-form game, and to a one they're engrossing and frequently emotionally affecting. Fans of outrageous, OG Spike and Mike type humor - where Austinite and Beavis and Butt-Head/King of the Hill creator Mike Judge got his start – probably won't find much here to their liking. But hey, this is the Oscars, not the Alamo Drafthouse, and Frog Baseball predates the internet, digital animation, and probably many current animators' birth dates. That said, this is a solid bunch of shorts, each engrossing in its own distinct style and tone.

Andrew Coats and Lou Hamou-Lhadj's seven-minute-long "Borrowed Time" features a battered old CG sheriff in the American West coming to terms with, for want of a better term, cowboy PTSD stemming from his reckless youth. Coats and Hamou-Lhadj have day gigs at Pixar and it shows both in the attention to crusty cowpoke minutiae and the film's emotional heft.

"Pearl," directed by Patrick Osborne, manages to cram in a whole lifetime's worth of father-daughter love and well-busked music in general in a brief six minutes. Something of a tearierker, the alt-rock leitmotif by Nicki Bluhm and Kelley Stoltz makes this one feel like an exceptionally well done music video

- and for all I know, it is - but there's no denying it's catchy as hell both lyrically and

Bulgarian-born Canadian animator Theodore Ushev uses near-monochrome woodcut to tell the story of "Blind Vaysha," a young girl who can see only the past in her left eye and only the future in her right. Based on a short story by Georgi Gospodinov, this is the headiest of the nominees this year, posing questions about the self, selflessness, and the struggle to exist in the moment. Alas, it was shot in 3-D and VR, something this reviewer could not experience.

At 35 minutes, "Pear Cider and Cigarettes" is far longer than any nominated animated short film in recent memory. It's also decidedly adult in nature, complete with cussing, boozing, and drug use. Director Robert Valley, in his first short film, relates what may or may not be the autobiographical story of Techno Stypes, a former hipster-cum-daredevil, who's currently down and out and badly in need of a liver transplant in modern-day China. Marrying a gritty, film noir-esque narration with some seriously evocative imagery, this is by far the most ambitious of the five films.

Pixar's predictably adorable "Piper" rounds out the quintet and is director Alan Barillaro's debut short, which fronted this past summer's Finding Dory. A sandpiper mother teaches her hatchling how to dig for clams on the shoreline while seemingly gigantic waves rush in and continually chase the li'l guy back to the nest. As with the vast majority of Pixar shorts, this one is guaranteed to make you go "Awwwww."

### **2017 OSCAR-** NOMINATED SHORT FILMS: DOCUMENTARIES -PROGRAMS A & B

D: Various. (NR, Program A, 74min.; Program B, 80 min.)

Misery and suffering know no national borders, but refugees from those conditions know all too well their demarcations. That is the message that comes through clearly in these five contenders for this year's Oscar for Best Documentary Short. Two of the shorts - "4.1 Miles," and "Watani: My Homeland" deal explicitly with the refugee crisis, while "The White Helmets" showcases the volunteer Syrian NGO that searches for and rescues civilians from urban airstrikes and danger zones. "Extremis," on the other hand, situates its camera in an American hospital where patients, families, and doctors struggle to make difficult end-of-life decisions. Only one of the films, "Joe's Violin," has a conventionally uplifting narrative arc with its story about a man who donates his old violin to a voung, needy student. These films all celebrate the human spirit and the will to survive, even if they're not certain that these aspirations will be met with a welcoming embrace.

Program B presents Orlando von Einsiedel's "The White Helmets" and Marcel

Mettelsiefen's "Watani: My Homeland," both of which deal with the consequences of the Syrian Civil War. Set in Aleppo as the violence there intensified in early 2016, "The White Helmets" highlights the work of this volunteer organization, whose members run

into the rubble caused by airstrikes, digging out living and dead civilians. As with most rescuers in horrific situations, the White Helmets must also worry about their own family members and loved ones. The film presents a ground-level view of their work. "Watani: My Homeland" also begins in Aleppo and reveals the harsh reality of a married couple and their four children. Devoted to the resistance, the parents try to shield their children from the daily bombardments by both the Syrian army and the ISIS fighters, but after the husband and father are taken captive, the mother makes a decision to flee with her children toward the hope of a better life in Germany. The film details the steps undertaken to acquire visas, say goodbye to family, and make the journey. The children all adjust nicely to life without bombings in a foreign land, while the mother, confident that she's done what is best for her children. still misses her homeland and has not heard anything about her husband's fate in more than two years. With this microcosmic look at one family, the filmmaker manages to reveal much about the modern-day refugee crisis. – Marjorie Baumgarten

### **○** 2017 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT FILMS: LIVE **ACTION**

D: Various. (NR, 134 min.)

When it comes to naming its best feature nominees, the Academy Awards famously has a bias against comedy. That bias trickles down to the live-action short films category, as well; social justice themes play better than slapstick with the selection committee. (Not so in 1932: Hal Roach and Mack Sennett won the first Oscars for live action short films, in comedy and novelty, respectively.) And so it goes with this latest batch of nominees - worthy, certainly, if trending toward drear. Gentle quirkiness is as about as far on the comedy spectrum any one short treads.

What these shorts do very well is speak to the times, with stories of resistance, refugees, and anxiety over our ever-advancing technology. "Sing," Kristof Deák's Hungarian short (if a hair too long at a drawn-out 25 minutes) about a children's choir and its conniving choirmaster, boasts a nifty twist and some fun national folk songs about roosters. Juanjo Gimenez's "Timecode" (Spain, 15 min.), set in the security booth at a parking garage, has a few tricks of its own in its telling of how the night shift and day shift guards communicate, even if the narrative logic of its end minutes had me scratching my head. "Silent Nights" (Denmark, 30 min.) is unique in how fullfeeling its portrait is of a Ghanian refugee in Denmark and the Salvation Army worker with whom he bonds over Christmastime; director Aske Bang compresses a lot of story into the short running time, aided by the sensitive performances by Prince Yaw Appiah and Malene Beltoft Olsen. Alternatively, "Ennemis Intérieurs" (France, 28 min.) takes place almost entirely in one scene and one space - an interrogation room in which a seemingly innocent citizenship interview turns into a

witch hunt. Sélim Azzazi's monstrously tense piece is the year's standout, an incredibly nuanced back-and-forth between two Arab men (played by Hassam Ghancy and Najib Oudghiri) that probes the different meanings of "liberté, égalité, fraternité." Still, I wouldn't be surprised if the softie "La Femme et le TGV" (Switzerland, 30 min.) takes the prize. Another film about an ingenious method of communication, Timo von Gunten's short stars pop culture icon Jane Birkin. Namesake of the Hermès bag, former lover of Serge Gainsbourg, she sure curled a lot of toes with her whispery "Je t'aime" back in the day, and it's a treat to see her onscreen again. Even playing a frumpy shut-in, she's luminous.

# O JOHN WICK: CHAPTER 2




The second chapter to 2014's out-ofnowhere hit has the same action verve and flair for inventive set-pieces that the first film did, and if anything, returning director Chad Stahelski (working solo this time) and screenwriter Derek Kolstad raise the stakes for this unexpected franchise. Chapter 2 picks up moments after the initial film ends, as John Wick (Reeves) engages in an intense car chase on the fuchsia-drenched night streets while heading for the garage housing his beloved 1969 Mustang, which was stolen

from him by the same bastards who killed his dog in the previous chapter. As in the first film, the legend of John Wick, aka the Bogeyman, is recounted by others well before Wick appears in the flesh, which also has the effect of establishing the character's background story for anyone just entering the fray with Chapter 2. With the old score from the first part finally settled, Wick finds himself unwillingly pulled into a new caper.

Keanu Reeves delivers his best work since The Matrix in this series, so it comes as an extra delight when Reeves' Matrix co-star Laurence Fishburne shows up in the latter half of John Wick: Chapter 2. Common and Ian McShane are also especially good as a fellow hit man and the manager of the New York Continental Hotel, respectively. The international hotel chain is also a carryover from the first film, but here given more elaborate life as a way station for hired guns and other perfidious evildoers. (Film icon Franco Nero



### RINGS

JVC may have manufactured the last VHS tape back in October of 2008, but that hasn't curtailed the heretofore presumed moribund Ring franchise, in which assorted millennials die seven days after watching a cursed videotape featuring vengeful, screenhopping ghost girl Samara and her long, long hair. While Gore Verbinski's original 2002 The Ring - itself a remake of J-horror auteur Hideo Nakata's 1998 mindblower Ringu was a surprisingly excellent Americanization of a very Japanese genre film, Nakata's film

remains the go-to high dark-water mark for fans. Both films had plenty to say about the craven nature of humanity when confronted with viral doom, but the inevitable stateside sequel (2005's The Ring Two) closely followed the law of diminishing returns, despite the participation of Sissy Spacek. Which brings us to Rings. I had hope that the digitization of a dead media spirit might offer a fresh take on the series, but while there's an abundance of spooky atmosphere courtesy of director of photography Sharone Meir, the story, by screenwriters David Loucka and Jacob Estes, feels like a stretch, with too little characterization of its human protagonists and way too much backstory on Samara. (A mysterious figure to begin with, piling on more explanatory exposition only serves to advance the plot in fits and starts while depriving the specter of her slimy, contortionistic, and reality-shattering charm.)

To director Gutiérrez's credit, Rings starts off with an in-flight bang before getting into the meat of the story: Twentysomething Julia (Lutz) has lost contact with her off-at-college boyfriend Holt (Roe). Setting herself in full-on Nancy Drew mode, she discovers her guy is part of an experiment led by human behavior professor Gabriel (Galecki), who has digitized the original VHS footage and is using his students as guinea pigs in a frankly baffling attempt to prove the supernatural exists. Or something along those lines. The theory that seems to be in play here is that if one were to keep passing the tape on to another (the only way to prevent a viewer's certain demise) within a closed loop of people, no one would ever have to risk Samara's wrath. Yeah, right.

Rings is an unfortunate and often incomprehensible mess that kicks off with a neat premise and then never fully explores it. The denouement, in which - spoiler! - the digitized Ring video is released online for all the world to see, is about the only truly memorable, not to mention horrific, shock in a film that's otherwise a snoozy retread of what's been done better elsewhere. Even Vincent D'Onofrio's blind cemetery caretaker with a hidden secret barely leaves a mark on your psyche. Die-hard fans of the original Japanese Ringu films are instead encouraged to check out the gleefully bonkers Fantastic Fest favorite Sadako vs. Kayako, in which the ghostly

antagonists of Ringu and Ju-on: The Grudge go head to head (hair to hair?), à la Freddy vs. Jason, only with far more entertaining results.

A struggling single mother in Santa Barbara circa 1979, Dorothea (Bening) enlists others to chip in with the molding and moral education of her son Jamie (Zumann). including her twentysomething boarder Abbie (Gerwig), who turns him on to feminism and punk music; another boarder, William (Crudup), a hippie carpenter; and Jamie's best friend Julie (Fanning), who is diving headlong into the sexual revolution but keeps the besotted Jamie at arm's length. That's a lot of 20th century culture clash stuffed under one roof, though clash is too emphatic a word: more like gentle friction. Mike Mills is an uncommonly empathetic filmmaker, and his autobiographically close movie is delightful - funny and dreamy and sometimes desperately sad. He's gift wrapped Bening and Gerwig the best roles of their careers, and they return the favor in spades. They, and this tender, searching film, are something to be cherished. (01/20/2017)



It's a chilling moment - pause to consider national obesity rates - and one of the few overt instances in which Robert Siegel's script encourages the viewer to connect the dots between these historical events depicted and the fast-food chain's now-ubiquity. Mostly Siegel and director John Lee Hancock (The Blind Side) stick to a "and-then-this-happened" account of how Kroc sayvily expanded the brand and edged the original McDonald brothers out of the business. While Hidden Figures is likable and illuminating, it is, nevertheless, routine and predictable. Competent and heartwarming, director Theodore Melfi's technique seems better suited to the TV-movie-of-the-week format than big-screen storytelling. I Am Not Your Negro uses the words of Baldwin's manuscript to explore the genesis and depths of America's so-called "Negro problem." Haitian filmmaker Peck blends an array of historical and contemporary footage, film and television clips, still photographs, written words onscreen, and music with Baldwin's words to excavate the roots of America's self-perpetuating fantasy of itself. Baldwin is a writer whose work belongs on every bookshelf in America, and now with this film. his words can be heard on every movie screen in the land. 



Hence the title: Monster Trucks! Apparently, the movie's raison d'être appears to rest entirely on that pun. At times, Monster Trucks faintly echoes E.T. - a boy trying to help an alien get home - but it has all the grace of a jackedup Ford F-150 with a four-link suspension and tractor tires crushing a row of cars by steamrolling atop them. With this second pairing with horror revitalizers Blumhouse Productions, writer/director M. Night Shyamalan seems to have recovered some of his former mojo. Using minimal locations and few characters, Split relies on James McAvoy's central performance and Michael Gioulakis' expressive cinematography to tell its story about a man with dissociative identity disorder (DID), the three girls he abducts, and the therapist who tries to help him. Give McAvoy an award (or 24) for his performance; the Scottish actor adopts so many different behaviors and speech patterns that it's impossible not to marvel at his versatility. Shyamalan (The Sixth Sense) also includes one of his signature surprise endings, although this one is something more like an in-joke than a shocker. The film's third act is somewhat wanting in tension and high-stakes emotions as the characters go through their paces. Still, as far as cinema's long love affair with DID dramas goes, Split ain't a half-bad contribution. (01/20/2017)

Daredevil government operative Xander Cage is the millennial generation's answer to James Bond. Trading in 007's classic tuxedo and dry martini for a tank top and a shot of adrenaline, the tatted-up muscleman who beds every scantily clad babe (or more) he meets never breaks a sweat even when skiing down a lush jungle mountainside or freefalling without a parachute. In this so-so sequel resurrecting the extreme sports athlete turned NSA agent, the suits once again enlist a reluctant Cage (Diesel) for a mission, this time to retrieve a stolen doomsday device called Pandora's Box. (A depressingly miscast Collette oversees the operation.) The stunt work is the best thing going here, just as in the first film of the franchise in which Diesel originated the role of X back in 2002. His subdued energy rarely commands the screen; you're often looking at him only because that's where director Caruso points the camera. (01/27/2017)

# John Doe Moves to Austin

"I'm a man of the world," declares **John**  $\mathbf{Doe}$ , singer/bassist of seminal Los Angeles punk band  $\mathbf{X}$ .

Nevertheless, the 63-year-old troubadour, actor, author, and poet must hang his hat somewhere at the day's end. While forever associated with California, Doe's leaving the Golden State and taking up residence in the land of Lone Star.

"I'm moving to Austin for an adventure," Doe tells "Playback," stopping short of saying exactly when.

The prolific singer/songwriter, who also founded primo cowpunk upstart the **Knitters**, says he's tight with lots of Austin folks. That includes frequent collaborator **Jesse Dayton**, also X's go-to guitar substitute, but not his co-bandleader in that act, X-wife **Exene Cervenka**, who indicated she was relocating to Austin in a 2014 **Rolling Stone** interview, but never made the move.

Another appeal: Doe says he can afford to buy a house here rather than perpetually rent in California.

"I've liked Austin ever since **Randy**["**Biscuit**"] **Turner** said 'Hey, man, come

on down,'" says Doe, recalling X's earliest visits to the state capital in the late Seventies – playing with the

Big Boys at Club Foot.

"The early shows were raucous. Everybody was trying to prove how punk rock they were. One of the shows, within the first two or three songs, someone threw a pitcher of water or beer on [X guitarist] **Billy Zoom**.

"Billy doesn't like that kind of stuff, because it messes up his guitar, so he walked offstage. **Chris Gates**, the Big Boys' bass player, got up, grabbed the mic, and said, 'Okay, this is how it's gonna go: The next person who throws something, I'm going to kill the whole area.'

"He was a big motherfucker too."

Doe, who released one of his finest solo efforts last year with dark Americana disc *The Westerner*, plays a "local" show Valentine's Day at the **Cactus Cafe**. The one-man set will pull from his songbook, potentially covers, and definitely X material.

Asked whether he's going to be visible on the Austin music scene or keep a low profile like legendary onetime Austin resident **Robert Plant**, he lets out a loud laugh.

"That's the first time my name has ever been mentioned with his," he chuckles. "I'm just gonna get there and live like an Austin citizen. I'm going to go to all the protests and I'm going to play at the **Hole in the Wall** on the Saturday of **South by Southwest**."

# HALF NOTES

SPOON HAS ENLISTED Gerardo Larios, keyboardist/guitarist for local Afrobeat ensemble Hard Proof, to fill their ranks as recent members Eric Harvey and Stephen Patterson have committed to backing Walkmen singer Hamilton Leithauser. Spoon drummer Jim Eno produced Hard Proof's excellent Public Hi-Fi Sessions EP.

THE BLACK ANGELS have announced a new album, *Death Song*, arriving April 21 on Brooklyn's Partisan Records. The title nods to the locals' inspirational namesake, Velvet Underground's "The Black Angel's Death Song." Select listening to the psych-rock linchpin's first LP in four years reveals unprecedented heaviness and lyrical clarity.

THE MOODY AMPHITHEATER, a 5,000-capacity music and performance arts venue to be erected in Waterloo Park, was announced last Sunday. Local megaphilanthropists the Moody Foundation bestowed the Waller Creek Conservancy with a \$15 million grant to create the project, slated to feature a fancy-sounding "steel and translucent stage-house structure," which is set to open in 2019.

**GARY CLARK JR.** has prepped a second live album for **Warner Bros**. Titled *Live North America* **2016**, it arrives March 17 and features performances captured while touring soulful sophomore LP *The Story of Sonny Boy Slim* last year, during which the local guitar force was red hot.

# **The Shopkeeper**

For three and a half decades, songwriters have been telling their stories through **Congress House Studio**, Austin's oldest continually operating recording facility. In new documentary **The Shopkeeper**, singer **Rain Perry** utilizes the recording facility and its workmanlike audio mystic **Mark Hallman** to dialogue about studios struggling to survive in the streaming age.

"Grandma's house meets world-class recording studio," is how musician **Donna Lynn Caskey** characterizes the SoCo compound.

The doc bulges with testimonials from Congress House devotees, including **Ani DiFranco**, **Eliza Gilkyson**, **Tom Russell**, **Johnny Goudie**, and **Sara Hickman**, all of whom make it clear what an inspiration owner/producer Mark Hallman has been on their lives and music. A multi-instrumentalist who produced/backed **Carole King** and led **Capitol Records' Navarro** humbly deflects praise to the magic of the building, calling it "one big, giant instrument."

The film, shot and edited by **Micah Van Hove**, furthers debate on how
the streaming era impacts grassroots
music makers, employing a clever
recurring device wherein **Jon Dee Graham** lectures on industry earnings
and trends.

"When I started making the movie, I was so frustrated with the music business, but Mark is so relentlessly optimistic and he loves making music so much that it kept me from going too dark," says Perry, who's recorded three albums with Hallman. "The spirit of needing to create is what prevails."

The Shopkeeper screens exclusively at the **Alamo Drafthouse South Lamar** on Sunday, 4pm, followed immediately by a musical afterparty at the **One-2-One Bar**.

# SOLE SURVIVOR, BROAD SUPPORT

Adam Nurre slept in the back of Porter & the Bluebonnet Rattlesnakes' tour vehicle last October when an inattentive trucker steam-rolled it from behind. The wreck on a North Carolina highway claimed the lives of his friends and bandmates Chris Porter and Mitchell Vandenburg, both of whom died at the scene.

"To say that it was the hardest thing I've ever been through is the understatement of the century," sighs Nurre, the group's drummer. "These two dudes were my brothers. Mitchell and I toured nonstop. We probably played 400-500 shows together. Porter was the person I'd call on a night off to have a beer or grill. I was with them every day.

"The aftermath is that these two huge figures in my life are gone, and dealing with that has been a huge challenge."

Nurre suffered broken bones in his left arm, breaks in both his feet, plus damage to his ribs, back, neck, and shoulder. The beat keeper, who usually spent half his nights onstage, couldn't play for nearly two months.

"It was soul-crushing, but when I picked up the sticks again it felt like an achievement. I knew then that eventually things were going to be okay," says Nurre, whose first show back was performing Porter's songs at a local, mid-December fundraiser to release his posthumous album. "It was so good. We were all feeling the same loss, in the same place. Grieving in a community setting was therapeutic and cathartic."

Nurre says the support he's received from the Austin music community as well as from friends and the families of Porter and Vandenburg has been a silver lining in dark times. In the days following the crash, Reenie Collins at Health Alliance for Austin Musicians (HAAM), Brad Pierson of the SIMS Foundation, and Marc Fort at the Texas Music Office came to his rescue via healing and financial help. Several memorial events have honored his bandmates, and now Friday, friends of the trio come together at the Hard Luck Lounge to raise money for Nurre and the families of the departed.

Planning to start anew in Nashville, the drummer will back **Carson McHone** and **Garner Sloan**. The lineup also includes **Ben Ballinger**, **Haydon Hoodoo**, **Josh Dodds**, **Mayeux & Broussard**, **Bonnie Whitmore**, and **Matt Phebus**. Beginning at 5pm, the benefit also stars the red washing machine Vandenburg used as accompaniment for his eclectic **Chester B. Bumblecrumb** performances. Donate to whack it with a baseball bat.

"The music community in Austin is a tightknit family," says Nurre. "We all struggle, grind it out, and try to make it in town, but when something bad happens to one of our own, everyone comes together."



# **Star Ladder**

Ex-Terminal Mind punk pioneer Steve Marsh explores outré galaxies in Evil Triplet

"We're popular in Romania!"

Steve Marsh cuts an imposing figure even seated. At 6-foot-5, he towers above most of the hustle and bustle at a South Austin eatery during Sunday brunch. In his long leather coat, shoulder-length white hair, and Lennon-esque granny glasses, he looks his part: veteran rock musician.

At this juncture in January, his local psych trio Evil Triplet readies the release of its molten, double-album debut Otherworld on homegrown Super Secret Records. Co-produced by the bandleader and Austin's longtime audio midwife Rob Halverson at Sonic Ranch Studios outside of El Paso a year ago, its dense acid shriek gained international buzz via internetleaked tracks "Star Ladder" and "Get a Job," the latter a fleshed-out leftover from Marsh's Eighties/Nineties industrial outfit Miracle Room. His phone alerts him to his pre-release foreign fame.

"Richard Lynn, who's the head of the label, texted me a while ago," chuckles Marsh, 60. "He sent me a screen grab from what must be Super Secret's website, showing clicks on our songs - how many plays they're getting. These are listed by country, and in Romania, there are 50 clicks on our song! One in Finland, one in Iceland, etc.

"Richard wrote above it, 'You're popular in Romania!""

What's it take to achieve Romanian stardom?

"Maybe because this is the first vinyl I've released since a self-titled Miracle Room EP in 1990," he offers. "There's been some CDs here and there. Knitting Factory Records released one by Wisdom Tooth, which was the band that followed Miracle Room, an all-homemade-instruments electric blues

kinda thing. Richard suggested we do vinyl on this, because the songs are all really long. They're not your three minute, punk rock-length songs."

Plenty of the latter are scheduled to resurface later this year, when Super Secret's vintage imprint Sonic Surgery issues a retrospective of Marsh's celebrated first wave ATX punk band, Terminal Mind. Initially called Red, the group festered in the wake of Ft. Worth native Marsh meeting twins Greg and Doug Murray at a party in early 1978, after he'd begun studying art at UT. Energized by Roxy Music, David Bowie, the Velvet Underground, John Cale, and Patti Smith, trained guitarist and pianist Marsh borrowed a bass once Doug assumed guitar duties, and Terminal Mind soon became noted for energetic, inventively staged shows. Like the night the band was entirely illuminated by black & white televisions tuned to static and test patterns at Austin's ground zero for punk, Raul's.

"It was a cool light to play in," recalls Marsh. "Very gray."

Their self-released 1979 EP captures a band already differentiated from other punk acts by the bassist's melodious baritone. Terminal Mind meshed the Damned's guitar aggression with the angular imagination of Pere Ubu and Wire, "I Want to Die Young" even betraying the Marxist funk influence of Gang of Four. The band split up in 1980 after Marsh brought in synth player Jack Crow.

"I don't think it was the synths that did it, though," reflects Marsh, "although Jack was certainly a polarizing figure within the band."

The Murrays eventually populated other seminal Austin DIY concerns, such as the Skunks. That followed Greg's stint in the Big Boys. Marsh and Crow moved on to the fully electro Civilian Sect, which also hosted the new-to-town Brian Beattie on bass, pre-Glass Eye.

Electronic explorations continued with Life on Earth, indulging Marsh's bent for unique staging by once playing on the catwalk above Club Foot's stage.

"I always find the interesting locations," laughs Marsh. "Just to break up the monotony."

Miracle Room's 1985 advent marked a dramatic break in Marsh's development. Spending the summer in NYC, he returned to an Austin awash in psilocybin, his head full of ideas inspired by witnessing German industrial clangsters Einstürzende Neubauten and the Butthole Surfers' aurally and visually assaultive acid-punk prime.

Utilizing a stand-up drummer banging on oil drums and various homemade instruments, Miracle Room evolved into what Marsh terms "weird industrial hoedown music."

"Those Texas roots bleed through," he nods today. "You can't keep them down forever."

Marsh took the hootenanny back to NYC in 1988, where he lived/worked/played for the next 16 years. After getting divorced and appearing in an Austin Music Awardsgenerated Raul's supergroup, he settled back locally in 2004, discovering an electronic noise underground that inspired his ensuing solo work. Evil Triplet's freak flag has now flown hard for two years.

Marsh's wah-wah guitar meshes seamlessly with Kirk Laktas' post-Mitch Mitchell drumming and Joe Volpi's heavy bass.

Laktas, noted for playing keyboards with everyone from Acid Mothers Temple to ST 37, moved to Austin as a Miracle Roomloving drummer just as Marsh left.

"So, the 17-year-old me is very happy about Evil Triplet!" Laktas exclaims. "Playing with Steve is very intuitive. The chemistry between all three of us is insane."

"I get to play off both of them," says Primordial Undermind/The Flood/Reverend Glasseye vet Volpi. "I walk around Steve's crazy guitar stuff, then lock into Kirk's crazy rhythmic ideas."

Experimentation continues driving the music. Marsh attacks his guitar with everything from a vibrator to a power drill. His songs reference tinfoil-hat conspiracy theory madness ("Planet I'm On") and attack dead-end jobs by folding crazed want ad lingo into the lyrics to "Get a Job."

"My lyrical perspective's more emotional, philosophical, experiential," says Marsh. "The songs come from wherever my head's at. If it comes out topical, it's because the times have caught up with it."

Evil Triplet deserves a Levitation slot at the very least, and/or co-bills with Ty Segall

and Thee Oh Sees. Marsh says it's down to the audience the band deserves stumbling across them. Even as Evil Triplet prepares to cut Otherworld's follow-up, outside projects abound.

The Terminal Mind retrospective will encompass the band's remixed EP. Live at Raul's outtakes, and unreleased studio tracks. Also this year, another Super

Secret offshoot issues a Ralph White/Marsh teaming the latter likens to "an Appalachian Syd Barrett record." There's even an experimental electronic project, Radar Cave, scheduled for cassette.

In fact, Marsh considers a return to punk rock, albeit one typically twisted by his vision. He speaks reverently of Metz's hard-charging Canadian mathcore. Of course he'd need a drummer adept at odd time signatures.

"I always approach things as an art project," he says. "I'm always looking to challenge myself, to honestly reflect whatever influences me at the moment. I'm always fine-tuning my voice."

# EVIL TRIPLET Otherworld (Super Secret)

"Don't forget to leave your world behind," croons Steve Marsh on "Star Ladder," lead-off track on Evil Triplet's debut album Otherworld. A fitting demand since the local trio wastes no time in shooting off into a similar orbit as fellow Austin travelers ST 37 and the Boxing Lesson. The band's power space rock punches all the right buttons: distortion, winding melodies, propulsive rhythms, astronautical lyrics, whooshing electronics - even the occasional Middle Eastern lift. Marsh's psychedelic immersion may come as a shock to punk historians who associate him with Terminal Mind, one of ATX's first and finest punk/New Wave bands. Yet the singer/guitarist explored outré music in New York mind expansions Miracle Room and Wisdom Tooth, while his rhythm section draws membership from My Education and Primordial Undermind. In other words, Otherworld isn't the radical break it might first appear. Marsh and company invest wholly here, soaring through the spaced-out "Pyramids" and romping through the cosmic slop of "Post Group Date Scene" as if acid has run in their veins since birth. Space was always the place.



## JOHN WESLEY **COLEMAN III**

### Microwave Dreams (Super Secret)

When it comes to honing a singular, iconoclastic voice to peak potency, sometimes more is less. Raucous Golden Boys ringleader, Wes Coleman boasts a frayed-cuff soulfulness flowing forth with an abundance that risks undermining the degree to which he might otherwise be celebrated. Pared-down runtime, top-notch production, and souped-up arrangements, Microwave Dreams presents the singer-songwriter-guitarist in the best possible light. Ten songs evince not a single clunker, each varying angles of their author's balance between ragged wit and earnest sentimental-



ity. Beneath the shambling nature of his vocal and lyrical approach, Coleman's strategic intuition for where to bend a note or turn a phrase imbues these songs with uncommon emotional gravity. Opening salvo "Shovel" seethes with Saturday night rock & roll liberation and implores, "Dance with me, motherfucker." Pitting acoustic guitar against a cocktail beat, the melancholic "On the Couch Again" embodies heavy-lidded languor by leaving narrative holes in all the right places. Harrowing keyboard riff setting the tone, "Hang Tight" rails against adversity for all occasions with equal parts pragmatism and romance, while "Jesus Never Went to Junior High" tongue-in-cheeks Over the Edge-style adolescent drug culture. "Exotic Tambourine" bops like a Seventies power-pop tutorial before "We Care About Love" capstones the set with chugging barroom piano and unabashed heartfulness. While Microwave Dreams glints the same ambitious spirit that gave rise to the Band's Music from Big Pink, Rolling Stones' Sticky Fingers, and the Minutemen's Double Nickels on the Dime, these touchstones get thoroughly subsumed into a fresh amalgam. Coleman's singular voice remains the critical imprimatur throughout.

# ALYSE BLACK

Alyse Black's fourth full-length cuts into distinct halves. The first, which plays like an anthology of Nineties pop vocalists, seems



guided by producer Eric Rosse, who's behind female singer-songwriter greats such as Sara Barielles and Tori Amos. The collaboration epitomizes best in slick lead-off "My Body Is Burning," with Black's throaty alto carrying the timbre of Jewel and peppering in spoken asides à la Alanis Morissette. Then, "Won't Let You Down," the seventh track of 10 on Alyse Black, signals a shift to bluestinged confessionals. That's where the singer shines. Where Black's voice feels constrained in pop, it rises above the gentle thrumming of guitar lines and warbly electric organ to a full blast of blues on "Make Love + Laughter," navigating her impressive range from falsetto to belting and back with ease. Although her voice transfixes throughout the album, it's the latter portion that's truly intoxicating. Abby Johnston

### **BLACK JOE LEWIS** & THE HONEYBEARS Backlash

Black Joe Lewis and his sixpiece Honeybears continue crashing modern soul music head-on with blues and dirty punk rock on their fifth studio LP, and first since 2013's



Electric Slave. Boasting a few R&B party rockers in the mold of past hits like "Booty City," Backlash celebrates the persuasive power of female gentalia on "PTP," while "Sexual Tension" hits with all the

subtlety of a sledgehammer. Even so, the album's a darker affair than previous efforts, brimming with paranoia and regret. Lewis exorcises demons on the gritty "Shadow People," a sinister mix of 12-gauge punk and blues without a single Stax-styled horn line anywhere in sight. On "Global," the gravelvoiced shouter wanders a postapocalyptic world "eating cockroaches and using sand for salt," while depicting "a fire burning in the

ghetto" over a Daptone groove on "Nature's Natural." At six minutes, LP closer "Maroon" finds the bandleader invoking runaway slaves as he simmers a slow blues into a blistering guitar solo. "I choose to live my life as a maroon ... And my past cuts me just like a knife." It's as unsettling as it is unpolished, but Backlash compels as much as anything this crew's put out.

### TJE AUSTIN I Belong to You

Less than six years removed from national exposure on The Voice. NBC's American rendering of the popular Dutch singing competition, Tje

Austin (pronounced Tye) presents I Belong to You, a refined affair trapped in oscillation and illuminating the singer's immense talent through an awkward recalibration of sound. The bluesy "Whiskey" as well as the stripped-down "I Belong to You" plat-

projects the album's most somber moment, "Everyone Goes Away," which grieves over the death of a loved one as a physical wound: "Sometimes, I feel like dying; my body, it hurts like hell." Austin also hits the mark on "Higher," nostalgic funk-pop about a bard dirty-macking his way out of the friend zone. For the high potential areas, there are equal measures of softness ("So Good"), sometimes leaning into cheese ("Next Time"). While effective overall, if only by grace of Austin's voice, I Belong to You leaves you asking for specificity that's more demonstrative. It lives in emotional almosts, Austin not always allowing himself to indulge white-hot anger, brimming elation, or the numerous confusions in between. Kahron Spearman


### SSB More Stories to Tell

The problematic More Stories to Tell features SSB – formerly Super Smash Brothers, likely abbreviated to negate



Nintendo cease and desists - casting no shadows over who they are, or whom they serve, while pushing party rap into tired excess. High points "Respect" and "Wake Up" underline the duo's capabilities, with stronger hooks and respectable optimism, especially on the latter: "Turning nothing into something, and something into greatness is the next thing that's coming." The unsophisticated remainder greatly disappoints, delving into steep and washed-over caricature, unimaginatively mentioning wax, wack liquor shot selections, and women. "Strip Club Pornstars" - which, get this, is about sex with strippers - features Hed PE rapper Jared Gomes revving up on the predatory behavior toward women tip: "I'll kidnap, ransom/ I'm handsome no worry, worry." Treading into racism and childishness, "Blunt Raps" offers a crude imitation of a convenience store attendant of Desi heritage. Aside from questionable production throughout, there's an irritating tendency to fall a hair ahead of or behind the beat. No question that ARay and Hack Naja are capable wordsmiths, but More Stories to Tell rings purposeless and overcooked.

## NEW BERLIN Basic Function (Super Secret)

Nerds with guitars, New Berlin comes bouncing out of the basement with Basic Function. Led by erstwhile one-man-bandit Michael Flanagan (formerly of South America, now based in McAllen), the trio on ascending Austin imprint Super Secret sounds like an artifact from the DIY Eighties, its angular garage-pop as informed by New Wave theatre as Nuggets. Like smart kids who prefer spinning records and strumming guitars to hanging out with the cool crowd, Flanagan and company channel their nervous energy into miniature explosions of tunes and sardonicism. "Hardcore Punk" and "Border Patrol" aren't the barely repressed rage of bored no-hopers, but the sputtering excitement of geeks who prefer not to get beaten up. "I'm sick of your shit" in "Face in the Mirror" is information rather than assertion. Supported by a rhythm section tight enough to propel a coin off its backside, Flanagan's plainspoken singing and crap-cutting guitar lines illuminate youthful angst, one hook at a time. ★★★





A generation once proclaiming "don't trust anyone over 30" now begins poking into its 70s. Disorienting?

"It doesn't feel any different," claims Austin's Joe Ely. "But it sure sounds a lot different. Of course, I felt that at 40, too."

How does the Lubbock native and Flatlanders de facto leader - he of a stage presence that's earned him comparisons to friends like Bruce Springsteen and the late Joe Strummer - plan on celebrating 70 years?

"I'm putting together a list of songs we'd like to play," he relates. "I'm inviting a lot of the musicians I've played with over the years. I'm looking at my 70th birthday as having fun and not work.

"There'll be guys like [guitarist] David Grissom, who I haven't played with for the last few years, and Lloyd Maines will play the whole set. It's going to be quite an array. I've invited other people

to come if they can, but I don't know who all is going to show up.

"I'm putting together a set list that'll be passed around between different eras of bands and leaving it open on both ends so that anything can happen."

Ely isn't just making music these days. He penned 2014 novel Reverb, released spoken word CDs, and works in the visual arts.

"I just started opening up and letting it go," explains Ely. "Some people at the University of Texas asked to publish my road journals. At first I said no. Then I started thinking about it, and I thought, 'This is just an extension of what I've done my whole life.' All these things were stories I've never told in any of my records. They were a part of my life, so I start-

# **METALLURGY**

Riff much? France's Alcest (Grizzly Hall, Sun. 12) seasons theirs with guitar crescendos and cavernous reverb, fusing black metal atmospherics with post-rock and shoegaze to craft sprawling, Explosions in the Sky-like excursions found on September's fifth LP Kodama. Swedish storm troopers Marduk (Grizzly Hall, Mon. 13) retry last fall's canceled blitzkrieg behind founding axe murderer Morgan "Evil" Håkansson's blackened power chords and tremolo picking, all jacketed in carpal tunnel-inducing blast beats and shrieks of Satanism and the Third Reich. Closing in on 30, extreme NYC outfit **Incantation** supports with blistering domination. Max & Igor Cavalera (Grizzly Hall, Wed. 15), co-founders of Brazilian death metal progenitors Sepultura, unearth the 20-year-old Roots, which blends contemporary nü metal with South American rhythms. Equally headline-worthy, Yonkers DM legends Immolation destroy beforehand with Feb. 24 high-water mark Atonement. In his latest incarnation, Agent Orange (Grizzly Hall, Thu. 16) frontman Mike Palm revs up SoCal surf rock into power chord fury, epitomized by the chorus of 1981's "Bloodstains": "Blood stains, speed kills, fast cars, cheap thrills." New Hampshire's Queers mosh too, with vitriolic sentiment in sugary melodies. Buffalo natives **Every Time I Die** (Sidewinder, Tue. 14 & Wed. 15) funnel deep-fried hooks, breakneck drumming, and Keith Buckley's swaggering, tuneful howl into a concoction equal parts punk, metalcore, and Southern rawk. - Bryan Rolli

### MIND SPIDERS. **DEAD SPACE** Beerland, Friday 10

Launched by Marked Man Mark Ryan in 2009, the Mind Spiders' dystopian post-punk hit full flower on 2016's Prosthesis. Fraved slivers of emergent synth-pop and New Wave augment the garage leanings of the Metroplex-bred combo's earlier work. Austin's Dead Space make a rare return to Beerland in the wake of bassist Quin Galavis' solo success with last year's My Life in Steel and Concrete. Fellow locals Nameless Frames summon an era-apropos, high-tension paranoia, while Sweet Talk's Stephen Svacina guides Missing Pages in a longing direction.

### THE COATHANGERS, SAILOR POON Barracuda, Friday 10

Eleven years ago, three Atlantans with limited musical experience began Coathangers as a joke, starting with their moniker's nod to DIY abortions. The ladies' eponymous debut served up a crass, irreverent explosion of lo-fi punk ("Shut the Fuck Up," "Don't Touch My Shit"). The band's fifth LP last year's Nosebleed Weekend, retains the flippant, middle-finger attitude with its cleanest dissonance vet. Austin's quietly post-punk duo Deep Time and feminist garage punks Sailor

# Hole in the Wall, Saturday 11

Wil Cope's lonely, lo-fi folk drawls an endof-the-night dread that excels in closing-time Iullabies. Gloom Shrine, latest in a string of EPs following debut Sunset Craves, continues the local balladeer's melancholic unraveling of the spaces between, propped in a haunting purgatory waiting for a sign. Roots-rocking Madison brothers Bronson Wisconsin open, with support from dark-hollered local Haydon Hoodoo and juke joint rhythms by Candler - Doug Freeman

### **CAMILA** ACL Live at the Moody Theater, Sunday 12

Mexico's Latin pop heartthrobs Camila get by without a bassist or drummer. Mario Domm's romantic timbre coalescing with Pablo Hurtado's classical-to-blues fretwork. 2006's Todo Cambió and Dejarte de Amar in 2010 sported saccharine singer Samuel Parra Cruz, while Elypse four years later didn't venture off the three-time Latin Grammy winners' sweet pop-rock ballads. Acoustic billetdoux "Abrázame," melodramatic "Mientes," and earnestly keyed "Bésame" garnered them millions of albums sold worldwide.
