Wonder Stories

The unbound adventures and outrageous duets of a life spent with science fiction

BY LOUIS BLACK

Close childhood friends of mine started reading science fiction shortly after we learned how to read (though it took me an extra 18 months or so to develop that skill), but though I loved Edgar Rice Burroughs and tried to get into the genre, I at first lost interest when it came to its written form. Then, when I was 14 or 15, I broke my arm in three places, ending up in a hospital in Harlem, N.Y., because my doctor attended there. When I was 12 and 13, I had worked at my uncle's drugstore in Harlem, so the community itself was well-known to me. Saturdays, when I worked, were amazing; it seemed like the entire population emptied onto the streets and that everyone knew one another. My maternal grandfather, who died before I was born, had owned the store, which my uncle inherited. My grandfather was exceedingly well-liked; on a number of occasions, while walking down the street, I'd had the slightly unsettling experience of older black women walking up to me, laughing as they said, "I knew your grandfather and your dad." Evidently, on my mom's side of the family, our eyes have a noticeable similarity that lends to easy recognition of that part of our clan.

At the time, Harlem was so much fun, though still very much a ghetto with empty lots and burned-out empty buildings. It didn't turn really ugly there until crack became epidemic, which then was still many years away. Now Harlem is becoming a thriving, upscale community as African-Americans move back into the inner city, buying old houses and restoring them.

Despite my feeling comfortable in that community, nights could still be a little intense. The hospital where I was taken



Our Science-Fiction Issue from Oct. 10, 1986, by the late Rollo Banks when I broke my arm was right across from a park. Although it never rose to even close to *West Side Story* action and melodrama, there was still all-night activity in the neighborhood and the park. Feeling very lonely, far from home (though I wasn't that far), and already well into an insomnia that was most pronounced only during the more reasonable times for sleep, I often would take a break from watching the evening to read. During the few days I was in there, I read Jack Vance's *The Dying Earth* and one of Lin Carter's Thongor books. Leaving the hospital, I had an arm in a cast and a new, enormous appetite for science fiction. I read everything I could find – and I could find a lot, because my friends were all SF readers.

Plunging in, I read the requisite giants of the time – Robert Heinlein, Isaac Asimov, Jack Vance, A.E. van Vogt, Damon Knight, and Frederik Pohl – as well as a lot of the pulp masters (I was reading a lot of pulps), including Edmond Hamilton and Lewis Padgett (Henry Kuttner and C.L. Moore). I read indiscriminately, not chronologically, so I'm probably messing up periods and leaving out dozens of authors. A "new wave" of SF writers of whom I was especially enamored emerged during the Sixties and included Roger Zelazny, Samuel R. Delaney, J.G. Ballard, and Michael Moorcock. There was also a handful of others who seemed to operate independent of linear chronologies: the extraordinary Harlan Ellison, Theodore Sturgeon, the hallucinatory Philip K. Dick, and Philip José Farmer.

To read this wonderful body of authors was to embark constantly on great, intellectual adventures unbound by the known, the three dimensions, and/or time. During this time, I attended a number of science-fiction conventions and other events; one of the highlights was invariably a seemingly spontaneous verbal confrontation between Harlan Ellison and Isaac Asimov. As my never-to-be-trusted memory has it, Asimov would usually be at the head of the room talking; Ellison and entourage would come slamming in through a back door and climb up on a table while hurling insults at Asimov, who would hurl them right back. I remember these outrageous, loud verbal duels as brilliant and hysterically funny.

By the time I got into reading science fiction intensely, I was already hanging out with Otto Binder, who lived in the town next to mine. I had gotten in touch with him because he was a famous comic-book writer, having authored the majority of the Fawcett Comics' Golden Age superhero Captain Marvel stories, as well as many stories of the Captain Marvel extended family. He wrote for most of the other major comic-book companies of the time, co-creating the Young Allies for Timely **Oops!** Last week's story "Will 'SAFE-P' and TDCJ Be Held Accountable?" contained two errors: incorrectly reporting that the term "Substance Abuse Felony Punishment" was coined after Gov. Ann Richards left office, when it was in fact in use during her administration, and incorrectly referring to Shirley Otto as Shirley Ott. The *Chronicle* regrets the errors.

as well as writing for Captain America, the Sub-Mariner, and the Human Torch and co-creating Kid Eternity for Quality. After Fawcett went out of business in the wake of a lawsuit brought by DC Comics, Binder went back to writing for DC, co-creating the Legion of Super-Heroes, as well as writing for Superman and creating Brainiac and the Phantom Zone, while also writing most of the first wave of Bizarro stories. For years, I was lucky enough to hang out with Otto, discovering along the way that he had written a lot of science fiction for pulp magazines and was regarded as a major SF author from about 1939 to 1941, writing under the pseudonym of Eando Binder (his first half-dozen stories or so were co-written by Otto and Earl, his brother, but Otto kept the name even after his brother stopped writing for the most part).

As usual, through what proved to be a truly great adventure and extraordinary opportunity, I was oblivious, rude, and usually preoccupied. In his library, Otto had hundreds of SF pulp magazines, so I proceeded to read my way through those, often spending hours and hours at his home, reading while he wrote. Frequently, I would stop reading to ask him questions, disturbing him in exactly the same ways as I now hate to be interrupted when I'm writing.

Together, Otto and I attended a number of Lunacons, New York City/regional SF conventions. One time, as Otto tried to introduce me to his old friend Arthur C. Clarke, whom at that time I hadn't started reading yet, I literally almost pushed Clarke out of the way because I wanted to stare at Samuel Delaney, who was standing talking a few rows ahead of us. Pearls before swine, gourmet meals fed to those with fast-food appetites.

When I moved, the group with whom I socialized was made up of Austin science-fiction writers. These included Steve Utley, Lisa Tuttle, Chad Oliver, and Bruce Sterling. I read a short story by one of them about a postapocalyptic world in which Indians ran strings of rustled cars; it just blew me away. Another story was about dodo birds, long thought extinct, being alive in Arkansas, while yet another, co-written with Utley, was about the famous battle at Little Bighorn, though it involved biplanes. Those three stories - "Mary Margaret Road-Grader," "Ugly Chickens," and "Custer's Last Jump" – were joined by many others. There was a later story about Dwight Eisenhower as a jazz horn player and one in which Laurel and Hardy, the Marx Brothers, and the Three Stooges were slapstick-racing through Iowa to try to stop the Big Bopper, Buddy Holly, and Ritchie Valens from taking off continued on p.6

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into the snowy night sky, where their lives ended. Howard Waldrop wrote all those stories, and so many more – though I expect some editors, even those completely untrained in dentistry, would have had an easier job pulling teeth than they did getting those stories from Howard.

When I first moved to Austin, Howard was living with Bud Simons in a house deep in the avenues. We'd spend day after day hanging out there, talking about writers, writing, and movies. It wasn't until sometime later that I realized I should have discouraged Waldrop from talking about his favorite moments from his favorite movies rather than encouraging him. The problem was that whenever he described a scene from a movie I hadn't seen, by the time I did, the celluloid reality paled against Waldrop's memory. Memory and brilliance combined in one of the great imaginations to invariably improve whatever Hollywood writers had initially authored.

Now, there were warning signs that should have attracted more of my attention. One day Simons and Waldrop got into an afternoonlong argument over whether the first person to stand at the end of that epic to declare "I am Spartacus" was Tony Curtis or Harold J. Stone; Waldrop argued it was the latter. In those days before VHS, much less DVDs, there was no resolving this argument except to note that the most primitive understanding of Hollywood dramatic structure argued for Curtis. Waldrop, probably just thrilled because he knew the name of that great character actor, argued eloquently for Stone all afternoon, in no way being dissuaded by the mocking of others.

Sometime later, Howard moved from Austin; there really isn't any good flyfishing here. He continued to write brilliantly and fish frequently, undoubtedly proving far more prolific at catching fish than finishing stories. Waldrop is back in town, but unfortunately he's ailing, recuperating from recent bypass surgery. I have no address for Waldrop, which seems appropriate in a way, but I bet if you get an e-mail or letter to Wayne Alan Brenner (**brenner@austinchronicle.com**), he'll get it to Waldrop (no phone calls to be conveyed, *please*!).

All these years later, so much of what happened runs together into a frequently chronologically impossible flow of memories. This issue is a special one devoted to science fiction. The *Chronicle* has done such issues in the past (see the cover that illustrates this column, for example), and we'll undoubtedly do more in the future.

This one, however, is dedicated to that great writer and our dear friend, Howard Waldrop.

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How Good Are the Musicians?

Two or three cheers for the Live Music Task Force and their attempts to level the playing field for local musicians ["Can the Bands Play On?" News, July 18]; fact is, every city in this country has the same problem ... too many musicians, not enough clubs to play in. It's just that proclaiming this town as the Live Music Capital brings in an abnormally higher level of chronic unemployables who think they rock, dude.

What nobody seems to be addressing is the fact that many of these folks aren't very good, are they? Who wants to go down to Red River and get their ears assaulted by band after band of "musicians" who know about 10 chords, write insipid lyrics, and can't even transpose their own songs from one key to another? If the level of talent were higher, the established clubs wouldn't have to bring in so many touring acts. They could pick and choose from the existing pool of "artists" already here.

Popular acts in town like Bob Schneider, for instance, don't hire chimps to back them up. He has solid, wellversed players who can help him get his music across. Those musicians have spent many, many hours practicing on their own and can play well.

If a person has chops and talent, he or she will attract an audience of some size, but even that doesn't guarantee a career in music. That's always been the case. It's like watching all those fools on *American Idol* who deceive themselves into thinking they can sing; and what's the ratio there? About one in one hundred actually make it past the judges. So ... if we have 8,000 people clamoring for steady work, probably about 800 or less are worth listening to.

If You Move Near an Existing Music Venue ...


Dear Editor,

People with noise issues who can afford to live in neighborhoods away from existing industrial, entertain-





professionals. And yes, "musicians desperately need savvy, professional career management" in "the Live Music Capital of the World."


The last artist I courted to sign a management agreement, Star de Azlan, moved to Nashville and signed a huge record deal with Curb Records. My pet peeve is how recording studio owners have been completely reluctant to sign any work-for-hire agreements that insure songwriters retain 100% of their intellectual property rights in any digital content created in these studios. Especially when these studio operators can download an artist's material at the click of a button, and be selling this material on some music website out in cyberspace ... and the artist doesn't even know that they are being ripped off!

Musicians that I have counseled are completely clueless (i.e. lack of professionalism) when it comes to the U.S. Supreme Court case of Community for Creative Non-Violence v. Reid concerning artists' rights and ownership in the "termination and renewal provisions" of the Copyright Act!

Many artists in Austin are having their intellectual property rights compromised due to ignorance of the copyright laws! Artists are unwittingly being ripped off by unscrupulous studio owners, and in turn, losing control of their intellectual property rights, as well as vast sums of money in the music business.

ACC is churning out ethical personal managers like me, but getting an artist in this town to sign a management agreement is like trying to pull teeth from some studio owner. Musicians won't sign these contracts ... and I won't do a bunch of free grunt work for them without this agreement in place.

P.S. To all the dummy, know-nothing musicians in Austin, a booking agent books you gigs at 10% ... a personal manager is a career counselor, and we generally earn a 20%-25% commission





In closing, "I was obliged to be industrious, and whoever else is equally industrious shall succeed, equally well." – J.S. Bach Peace.



Matador. This is incorrect. Matador licensed Dizzee's debut album, *Boy in da Corner*, from XL several months earlier. That's the only album of Dizzee's we've been involved with.

Later in Hoffberger's intro, the writer says of Dizzee, "his move to the Definitive Jux label, much larger than Matador and known for turning out a steady stream of alternative hip-hop, forced his creative hand."

Again, this is incorrect. Dizzee didn't move from Matador to Def Jux. XL licensed *Maths* + *English* to the latter. While many of us at Matador remain steadfast fans of El-P's fine label, Hoffberger would surely struggle to explain how Def Jux is by any measure a "much larger" label. I mean no disrespect to Def Jux in any the slightest, but I do not understand how selling fewer records, having fewer releases and a smaller artist roster would make an imprint "larger" than Matador.

Boy in da Corner remains the top-selling Dizzee Rascal album to date in the United States. In fact, Matador has sold twice as many copies of said title as Dizzee's subsequent two albums have totaled for two other labels combined.

NAKED CITY

The 2008-09 proposed budget for the city of Austin was unveiled Wednesday morning, featuring a proposed tax rate of 40.28 cents. That's a small step down from the current rate of 40.34 cents but, due to rising property valuations, brings in more money - \$209.1 million of the city's \$620.7 million General Fund. An anticipated budget gap was closed with what city officials described as minimal service disruption: city employees' raises (a 2.5% pay-for-performance boost) will

come in December, later than usual, while branch libraries may face possible one-day-a-week closures. City Council will examine the budget all through August, before voting on it in September. For more on the budget, see "Beside the Point," p.14. Wells Dunbar

- Monday night's meeting of the city's Urban Renewal Agency board of commissioners did nothing to clarify the future of the Victory Grill. Board members did vote to approve changes, requested by the Austin Revitalization Authority, to a project in the 900 block of East 11th Street. But it could not pass a vote on whether to recommend ARA's changes to the 1100 block (also known as "Block 18," on which the Victory sits) to the city's Planning Commission. Urban Renewal Agency Chair Kevin Cole (husband of City Council Member Sheryl Cole) said, "This basically means our agency is silent on the issue, and that's unfortunate." Among the failed motions were attempts to reduce the office component of ARA's plans and to raise the percentage of affordable housing and retail. The management of the Victory Grill is concerned that the project could tower over the historic blues juke joint and possibly cut off side-street access to the club, and other neighbors also complain that ARA's plans are too intense. Rudy Williams of the Organization of Central East Austin Neighborhoods said his members worry about 11th Street becoming a "canyon" of four- and five-story buildings. The ARA proposal now moves on to the Planning Commission, probably in August. - Lee Nichols

Reading the Roots

They came, they saw, they blogged

If you retained any lingering doubts whether the "netroots" are necessary, a glance at Sunday morning's Statesman would have alleviated them. The front page featured a Netroots Nation convention wrap-up ("Netroots gets a lift from unexpected visit by Gore") by Patrick Beach so inane it appeared to be compiled from a cartoon manual of smear-the-liberals clichés: Insert condescendingly and at random terms like "intellectuals," "Birkenstocks," "no fun," and so on. The worst of these witless jabs was a lead sneer at U.S. House speaker and convention speaker Nancy Pelosi, to whom Beach applied this pathetic zinger: "[Pelosi] is arguably so left-leaning that her parenthetical should be D-Beijing."

Even setting aside the employment of a form of red-baiting so antique it recalls the Eisenhower administration, the man who wrote that feckless sentence simply doesn't know the actual contemporary meanings of "left," "Beijing," or even "Nancy Pelosi," none of which belongs in the same punch line. Why he would be assigned to cover a convention of left/liberal political activists at all is a question that seems not to have occurred to his Statesman editors.

Or at least not until the story appeared and went viral via DailyKos, where Editor & Publisher editor (and convention speaker) Greg Mitchell wrote about it, less annoved than puzzled by Beach's dreary compilation of warmed-over Sixties stereotypes. The Kos site and then the Statesman site soon began to catch serious flame from readers both outraged and astounded by the daily's ineptness, but by Monday morning, both the reader comments and Beach's story had been scrubbed from the Statesman site. That was followed (online Monday, in print Tuesday) by Editor Fred Zipp's semi-apology "In trying for a humorous take on the Netroots phenomenon without labeling it something other than a straightforward news story, we compromised our standards." Keep trying, Fred. (And he did: On Tuesday afternoon, Beach's story - now labeled "Commentary" - suddenly reappeared under Zipp's apology. Watch that space.) As for "standards" - the first homepage-posted Statesman story from the convention was a video "interview" with "Obama Girl" Amber Lee Ettinger, in which the spokesmodel came off more intelligent and more courteous than her interrogator.

The Statesman can clean up its own mess suppressing the Beach story and comments only compounded the initial silliness - but it's worth noting that without the quick reaction and buzzing response from those pesky netroots, Beach's lame caricature would have quietly become the local mainstream "perspective" on Netroots. Mitchell's contemporaneous continued on p.14



mockery, amplified by the blogosphere, quickly highlighted the story's superficiality ... and impertinently burst its bubble of hot air.

Solve This

On to more substantive matters. Although comfortably Dem blue in sentiment, the convention was no ideological monolith, and Pelosi was treated to sharp questions from the Web and the floor about the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, impeachment, the endless Iraq war, and the failure of congressional Dems to do much about any of them. She dodged most of these (a Q&A with 2,000 people is not terribly productive), specifically blaming the FISA surrender on 17 Democratic senators ("This was the best bill we could get") and punting the simmering question of administrative accountability for high crimes and misdemeanors to Judiciary Committee Chair John Convers. Despite some intermittent grumbling and a listless Code Pink Superheroes chorus line (don't ask) at the back of the hall, it was largely a Pelosi-friendly crowd. And when special guest Al Gore appeared, to promote the aggressively bipartisan WeCanSolveIt.org, the session suddenly became a multiple-ovation enviro rock concert.

Inspiring, but not terribly newsworthy. Gore issued his challenge that the U.S. move to a completely renewable-energy electric grid in 10 years (see the website for details), a beaming Pelosi didn't quite sign on, and there were a couple more ovations. Gore closed, "I want your grandchildren to know that you were there at the beginning of the effort to reclaim American democracy."

Waiting for Obama

That remained very much an open question. As at most conventions, the grittier action was in the workshops and panels, where speakers and activists mulled the war, the constitutional crisis (make that crises), the still undefined promise of an Obama administration, the narrow possibilities of a real "change" election, and the rather more likely continuity of current federal policies, domestic and international, in the absence of an effective democratic opposition. Keynoter Lawrence Lessig addressed the broader problems on that score in his engaging Saturday presentation of "Change Congress" – the latest and cheerfully quixotic attempt at serious, bipartisan campaign finance reform (see "Bloggers and Pamphleteers," July 11).

And the overall tone of the convention was undeniably upbeat, although several speakers cautioned that the only thing that can keep the feds honest – Republican or Democrat – is widespread, persistent public pressure, a notoriously fickle weapon. Mark Danner, in a discussion of "War Pundits," contemplated the broad swings of public support for and against the Iraq war – largely determined by the evanescent scent of "victory" – and cautioned his audience against presuming that public sentiment is always admirable or reliable.

The dourest panel on matters of public responsibility, taking place on Saturday afternoon, included Jen Nessel and Vince Warren of the Center for Constitutional Rights, ACLU staff attorney Jameel Jaffer, and reporters Jeremy Scahill (Blackwater) and Dahlia Lithwick of Slate. The grim atmosphere on the dais was entirely earned: The CCR folks have been defending Guantánamo prisoners for years, with mostly symbolic success; Jaffer had just sued the feds again to block FISA (see "Point Austin," July 18); and their respective beats (Iraq for Scahill, the Supreme Court for Lithwick) have not exactly given the reporters a rose-colored view of the U.S. government. Much of the discussion concerned how an Obama administration (if willing) could pursue accountability for war crimes, constitutional violations, and other widespread lawbreaking under the Bush administration - if not for punishment, then at least for a true historical accounting.

The prospects appear slim. Scahill declared bluntly, "[Accountability] would only happen if the Democrats weren't the Democrats, and the Democrats are the Democrats." It was difficult to disagree, since the highest profile Dems on the weekend's program – notably Obama legal adviser Cass Sunstein and Pelosi herself, among several others – were visibly skittish at any mention of prospective accountability, not wanting (in Sunstein's defensive phrasing) to "criminalize policy differences."

The Long March

Admittedly, the wry skepticism of this panel (Scahill: "I'm not asking you to divorce Obama, just to cheat on him with the Constitution") was on the whole a convention exception. The prospect of "Turning Texas (and everywhere else) Blue" suffused the weekend with a heady Democratic optimism, an implacable conviction that yet another "long national nightmare" is nearing an end. Speakers kept counting down the days to the November election or the end of the Bush administration or pondering the "first 100 days" of the Glorious Era of Obama. There's nothing wrong with any of that – elections aren't won by the disillusioned, as Republican campaigners are bitterly learning. But it's worth keeping in mind that an election is only the beginning, not the end, of a very long campaign for peace and justice.

BESIDE THE POINT Welcome Back ... to an All-Nighter

What have I learned goosing the gargantuan agenda for this week's City Council meeting, the first for the new council, coming on the heels of a month's hiatus? Lease renewals at **Austin-Bergstrom** mean big changes for your food court options. (Sayonara, Wok N Roll!) The commission overseeing the **23rd Street Renaissance Market** on the Drag could conceivably be cashiered. And with Mayor Will "Fog of Profanity" Wynn's proclamation of a "**Road Rage Awareness Month**," irony is alive and well at City Hall.

But despite the massive agenda, brimming with all manner of long-simmering items – more on that in a minute – one pressing matter appears only in a cursory way yet looms over the new council: **the 2008 city budget**.

While all council does officially today is set future public hearings and final readings in September, that doesn't mean they're resting on their laurels: A Wednesday work session saw a presentation of the proposed budget in its sprawling entirety. The process has changed under City Manager Marc Ott to become more open - traditionally it's called "the city manager's budget," but Ott was quick to note, "We've all had a hand" this year. (Is that to spread credit or blame?) Nevertheless, some of the traditional prestidigitation persists, like the ritual, miraculous closure of the predicted \$25.3 million "budget gap," To go with a \$4.7 million increase in the revenue projection, budget officer Greg Canally broke down \$20.2 million in administrative savings that the city had scraped together: \$9.9 million in support and internal service (e.g., keeping the transportation fund flat), plus \$3.5 million in "corporate savings" for staff (e.g., a 2.5% "pay for performance" raise for all city employees rather than 3.5%) and \$6.8 million in savings across city departments - where citizens are most apt to feel them.

What are those departmental cuts? A freeze on 24 vacancies with Parks & Recreation, which may mean "minimal slippage," according to Canally, on mowing and park cleanup. An EMS cadet academy isn't planned, while the fire academy will shrink. And, surprising nobody, branch libraries could close possibly one day a week - Ott and Canally noted the proposal came from Austin Public Library Director Brenda Branch herself, as part of a funds reallocation for hiring more security and janitorial and maintenance teams to keep libraries cleaner and safer. "Employees on a day-to-day basis feel unsafe," said Ott.

SOUNDS LIKE A PLAN

And with 150 or so other items on the agenda, it's good they covered the budget a day earlier. Running down the list: • Item 40 could indeed spell the end of the **Renaissance Market Commission**; absent a full board and quorum most meetings, the group has been marked for dissolution. While the commission recently adopted standard bylaws, it's uncertain whether that's enough to keep it intact or instead pass market licensing duties to city staff.

• Item 45, a consent item, would approve second and third readings of an update to the **Austin Tomorrow Comprehensive Plan**, a master plan for the city adopted in 1979 – and not revised since.

• As promised, Item 86 from **Mike Martinez** puts the kibosh on the **Mobile Loaves & Fishes** Eastside housing center for the homeless. Martinez and **Sheryl Cole** are putting the program on hold for 12 months, lest hyperventilating neighbors hurl another round of spittle-flicked invective in their faces.

• Also from Cole comes Item 87, evaluating city procedure related to enormous Downtown events (like South by Southwest, we assume) as they relate to "public safety and nuisance issues." Does that mean a moratorium on Stunna-shade-sporting Los Angeles hipsters in March? If that's not a nuisance ...

• Cole keeps rolling, next with Item 88, a controversial change to Eastside zoning along East 11th and 12th streets. Some on the city's Urban Renewal Agency had been pushing for what the resolution calls "increased height limits and greater flexibility in permitted uses," yet at its meeting this week, the URA decided not to recommend it; adjacent neighborhood associations, some merchants, and the Victory Grill (which is worried about being swallowed up on either side by tall buildings) are concerned by the zoning changes. • The 10:30am morning presentation

is a Downtown Austin Plan Rail
Analysis, while a 2pm briefing covers
Austin Energy's Future Energy Resources
and CO₂ Cap & Reduction Planning.
The 40-item zoning agenda would be painful any way you slice it, but Item 136, regarding the proposed

Community Partnership for the

Homeless project on Manor Road (likely headed for postponement), should twist the knife especially hard.

the upcoming November ballot), the 93-page study reports that Austin has actually been relatively reserved in its use of incentives. Between 1991 and 2006, the city signed just 19 tax incentive deals, compared to 208 in Dallas and 91 in Houston. The report also found that the city's five most recent firm-based (vs. project-based) incentive deals appear to be yielding net economic benefits for the city. Oden did find room for improvement: The complete costs of incentives to projects like the Domain, the Computer Sciences Corp., Mueller, and the Triangle, for instance, were indeterminable. Oden's study recommends, among other reforms, that the city report the total taxpayer costs of subsidies as well as the city's annual expenditures per project. *Katherine Gregor*



Artists and art fans are rallying to defend the **Enchanted Forest**, an outdoor gallery and performance space in South Austin, after the city yanked its permit. Since opening in 2004, the Forest has been operating under a **temporary-use permit**, but on July 18, owner Albert DeLoach announced that the city withdrew it. This change means there cannot be more than 49 people on the site at any one time, which effectively padlocks the doors for most events. The 3½ acre wood, located at the junction of Oltorf and South Lamar, has become a center for local artists, musicians, and other performers, and it won a *Chronicle* "Best of Austin" award for Best Stroll in the Woods in 2007. It has hosted a series of events, including the annual "Art Outside" exhibition, a haunted Halloween attraction, and even the wedding of local artist Randy Jewart and his wife, Monica Asencio (pictured above, in a gazebo created by artist Mary Quite Contrary), on June 28 this year. DeLoach has pledged to work with city officials to find ways to reopen the Forest as soon as possible and deal with any possible code violations.

- Bicyclist Vilhelm Hesness was hit and killed by an SUV last summer as he was riding lawfully on Manchaca Road near FM 1626 in South Austin. The driver who hit him, Richard Alan Lee, was under the influence of five prescription drugs at the time, including sedatives, an antidepressant, and a tranquilizer, according to toxicology reports. He was charged with intoxication manslaughter, a second-degree felony punishable by up to 20 years behind bars. Lee is scheduled for sentencing this Friday, but a plea agreement from Travis Co. prosecutors, which he's likely to accept, has Hesness' friends outraged. According to the county clerk's office, Lee will plead guilty and receive eight years' probation, 200 hours of community service, have his driver's license revoked for one year, and serve 60 days in county jail. "There's no end to the expletives I could expound," said Dale McCormick, a friend and cycling partner of Hesness. "He OD'd on five drugs and killed a man; it might as well have been murder, and he's going to do 60 days? This sends a horrible message. It just says what a cyclist's life is worth: not very much." - A Schleicher Co. grand jury on Tuesday issued **seven indictments** on nine counts of sexual assault and bigamy against six members of the **Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints** including imprisoned polygamist prophet Warren Jeffs. Jeffs has been in prison since he was convicted on charges of rape-as-accomplice in Utah; he's currently awaiting trial on similar charges in Arizona. *Jordan Smith*



At first blush, Villa Antonia, a local wedding and events venue, looks to be a fairy-tale spot in the Hill Country. However, the venue doesn't welcome fairies: Gays and lesbians are barred from holding commitment ceremonies on the grounds. That's what Wheatsville deli manager Dana Tomlin and her partner, Carol Campbell, learned recently when they were shopping around for a locale for their upcoming nuptials. The couple's wedding coordinator made an appointment with Villa Antonia, and the two women were given the full tour of the site, which rents for \$1,500 to \$5,000 for a half-day. But, according to the couple, when the words "commitment ceremony" were mentioned, the love-birds were immediately rebuffed. As Tomlin recalls: "The representative said, 'I don't mean to offend anyone, but we don't do those out here.' I had to bite my tongue to keep from saying something rude." A Villa Antonia representative confirmed the venue's policy banning ceremonies for same-sex couples: "We do not book weddings which are not legal in the state of Texas." Tomlin says: "We were humiliated and angry. Sure, marriage for me is not legal, but I don't need 'legal' to tell me who to love and how. They should at least put that policy on their website upfront, so people know." - Abe Louise Young

BEYOND CITY LIMITS

- According to the Bolivian newspaper Los Tiempos, Catholic lay missionary Michael Marroquin has been sentenced to 25 years in prison, after a Bolivian court found him guilty of child molestation and human trafficking. Marroguin moved from Austin to Bolivia in 1997 to run the Round Rockbased Project Angels of Hope charity designed to provide social-service support - including food and education - to more than 100 children in the poverty-ravaged Chapare region. Last spring, the charity's U.S. board of directors, headed by Monsignor Tom Frank of the Austin Diocese, began to receive reports from Angels of Hope workers and volunteers, describing increasingly irrational conduct by Marroquin - including arbitrary rages and sexual misconduct. The board on May 11 told Marroquin that it would no longer support his presence at the charity; five days later, after the international child-protection agency Defence for Children International initiated an investigation into Marroquin, he was arrested and jailed by Bolivian authorities. (For more on Marroquin, see "Angels in South America," Aug. 31, 2007.) Acccording to the Bolivian paper, the trial included the testimony of several child witnesses. The children's parents, the paper reported, are pleased with the verdict. - J.S
- Ending months of speculation, former U.S. Rep. Chris Bell announced on July 20 that he will be running for Galveston's Texas Senate District 17. The seat became unexpectedly vacant when GOP incumbent Sen. Kyle Janek announced in January that he would stand down with two years left in his term, triggering a special election in November. Bell, who mounted an unsuccessful challenge to unseat Gov. Rick Perry in 2006, became famous in Congress for filing a successful ethics complaint in June 2004 against House Majority Leader Tom DeLay. So far, three Republicans have filed for the seat: Texans for Tax Limits founder Austen Furse, former District Judge Joan Huffman, and civil trial attorney Grant Harpold. - R.W.



The **State Board of Education** is taking flak for its 10-5 approval of new **public-school Bible class curriculum** standards. The rules, passed July 18, provide implementation guidelines for school districts for House Bill 1287, which allows for electives in "academic, non-devotional study of the Bible." But critics both devout and secular call the rules vague and ripe for misinterpretation. Texas Freedom Network Deputy Director Ryan Valentine said, "The State Board of Education just threw those districts and their teachers under the bus" by leaving them open to court cases for unconstitutional courses. Mark Chancey, chair of the Department of Religious Studies at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, said the guidelines will institutionalize the teaching of the most conservative doctrines in some districts. "Using public schools to promote some religious views over others is not religious freedom," he said. "And it's not constitutional." — *R.W.*



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Netroots Farewell Stay focused!

The **Netroots Nation** convention, held last weekend at the Austin Convention Center, gathered politicians, liberal bloggers, and online activists. It also made clear the political links and disagreements between the 2,000 progressives in attendance and the Democratic Party that hopes these online activists will aid it in the November campaign.

While the event was independent, several big-name guests came from the Democratic Party's upper ranks. Democratic National Committee Chair **Howard Dean**, in his Thursday night opening keynote address, praised the netroots for helping build the

paradigm-busting campaign infrastructure that now makes possible his 50-state campaign strategy. On Saturday, U.S. House Speaker

Nancy Pelosi, who rejected delivering a

speech in favor of a two-hour Q&A, was upstaged by her own surprise guest: former Vice President **AI Gore**. The other surprise appearance was Libertarian Party presidential candidate **Bob Barr**, gathering a cluster of bemused onlookers when he held an

impromptu press gaggle later that day. The general tone of discussion focused on how to get progressive Democrats into office in November – and more to the point, keep them progressive. Some, like Texas U.S. Senate hopeful Rep. **Rick Noriega** and Texas state Senate contender **Joe Jaworski**, held special panels to meet the bloggers. Others, like **Glenn Nye**, running in Virginia's 2nd Congressional District, simply worked the convention floor to build name awareness.


The Dems didn't get a free ride – speakers and panelists savaged Congress for failing to derail, or even slow, the grander priorities of the Bush administration, especially the war in Iraq. The greatest criticism was reserved for Pelosi's appearance. While her presence was generally well received, there was some dissension from the floor over its format. Audience questions had been submitted online and ranked by attendees in advance, via **AskTheSpeaker.org**. Yet some were angry that, while Pelosi was asked about the Foreign Intelligence

Surveillance Act and the Iraq war, the moderators (primarily Netroots Nation Executive Director **Gina Cooper**) did not hold her feet to the fire. Netroots Nation board member **Adam Bonin** rejected this complaint, comment-

ing later, "It's not our job to enact a ritual bloodletting here."

In his closing address, **Green for All** President **Van Jones** sent the online progressive community home with a clear message not to lose focus. Comparing the task of unraveling the impact of 50 years of a conservative agenda to "cleaning a barn with a straw," he warned them that an Obama victory in November would be the beginning, not the end, of that ongoing battle against reactionary ideologues. He told them, "There are dragons on the right ... that will make us miss John McCain."

John Dean on Bush The second coming of George III

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There's a famous story of heavyweight Republican consultant Karl Rove brushing off poor GOP poll numbers just prior to the November 2006 election, telling a reporter, "You have your numbers: I have the numbers." Former White House counsel John Dean argues that the Republicans have taken the same approach to basic freedoms. "I think it's probably true with all provisions of the Constitution," explained Dean. "They pretty much read them the way they want to."

Before his panel appearance at the Netroots Nation convention, the onetime White House counsel to President Richard Nixon and, in recent years, constitutional commentator. appeared at a July 17 fundraiser for Austin's North by Northwest Democrats at the North Lamar Waterloo Ice House. Much of the Netroots community has reacted strongly against the July 9 U.S. Senate vote passing the new Foreign Intelligence Surveillance **Act**. The law effectively rewrites the Fourth Amendment, the protection against unreasonable search and seizure, to fit the administration's world-view - that national security

trumps the Constitution and the president makes his own law. Dean decried the decision and said, "It's just amazing that the weakest president since Nixon can get through the amendments to the FISA bill he iust did. when most Americans who know anything about it are horrified by it." But he

added that the Internet community shouldn't feel singled out by the administration in its spinning of the Constitution. "With the Second Amendment, long before the Supreme Court ruled that [the right to bear arms] was about personal rights, they've been reading it that way," he noted.

Dean came to public prominence for giving insight into the workings of the White House, and former White House press secretary and Austinite Scott McClellan has followed suit with his recent book. What Happened: Inside the Bush White House and Washington's Culture of Deception ("belatedly," noted Dean). While McClellan wrote about the Texans in the Bush cabinet (see "Who Did He Serve?" June 20), Dean sees another side of the equation: the veterans of Nixon's cabinet and campaign machine who survived to become pivotal in Bush's administration. The highest ranked is Dean's fellow former Nixon staffer, Vice President Dick Cheney, whom Dean described as "our best living example of the Peter Principle ... people succeeding beyond their levels of competence, where they then exercise their power and show their incompetence."

There are many other former Nixonites: ex-Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld (whom Nixon called a "ruthless little bastard," as a compliment), former Deputy Secretary of Defense Paul Wolfowitz, sometime Bush foreign policy adviser Henry Kissinger, and even Rove, a Young Republican protégé of convicted Watergate conspirator Donald Segretti. Dean recalled what he was told by Rep. Jane Harman, D-Calif., when she was a ranking member of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence: "She was convinced, as someone who had an understanding of recent history, that Cheney and his closest aides were still fighting Watergate, that they had never gotten over it, and they were trying to revive the Nixon presidency."

With the people come the policies, and again Dean finds in Bush echoes of Nixon's tactics of scouring legal history for justification. "I remember reading a brief the Nixon administration submitted on electronic surveillance," he recalled, "and they literally drew on George III as a precedent. We laugh at that, but the problem is, today you've got legal

scholars advising the Bush administration drawing on the precedents of George III."

Dean argues that traditional conservative thinkers would have been appalled by the extraordinary loading of powers into the presidency. This time it's through Article II of the Constitution - the

commander-in-chief clause - which he says the founders saw mainly as a label. Again, Dean argues, this finds the Bush administration using the absolutism of George III as a model and dressing him in a cloak of constitutionality. He explained: "He can go to war any time he wants to; he can ignore the Parliament or the Legislature. So to me, these

are facades of legitimacy that they use to make their case over policy objections." Dean sees the same proclivities in some of

the ranking Texas Republicans, calling them "marginally able." The day before former Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, quit his post as cochairman of Sen. John McCain's presidential campaign after describing America as "a nation of whiners," Dean said he "has a great résumé but, as he's obviously shown, a totally tin ear." As for Sen. John Cornyn, Dean called his continued political career "mortifying," adding: "He looks like a senator, but he doesn't act like one. I find him fairly pathetic." He similarly condemned Texas' biggest political export: President George W. Bush. "I'm sure he's a very likable person," said Dean, "just not terribly suited to run the country." - Richard Whittaker



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

Cap Metro Cancels Shuttle Services

Amidst a historic upsurge in public enthusiasm for taking transit, Capital Metro is ... ending its **shuttle service to special events**. As a result, hundreds of thousands of Austinites trying to reach crowded events like the recent July Fourth fireworks celebration at Auditorium Shores have lost the benefit of Capital Metro shuttles. The decision slashes shuttles to more than a dozen popular community events; in future months, those will include the Austin City Limits Festival, Halloween on Sixth Street, UT football games, and the Trail of Lights. Unless private charter companies seamlessly step in to replace all of the free shuttle services with new pay-to-ride shuttle service – a dubious prospect – everyone on Austin roads will suffer from increased traffic congestion during big events.

What's going on? Cap Metro says it is retreating in fear of federal guidelines enacted in 2005, in response to **specialinterest lobbying** by the private-charter bus industry. Basically, the private sector didn't want any charter-service competition from transit agencies, and the current administration capitulated. This spring, the feds clarified a precise definition of charter service, stimulating the recent Cap Metro withdrawal. "Under the new policy by the Federal Transit Administration that took effect April 30, public agencies cannot operate charter bus service if private charter companies are interested and available to provide the service," stated a July 17 media release from Capital Metro.

According to Cap Metro VP **Doug Allen**, "The definition of charters in the regulations states, 'the service is not part of the transit provider's regularly scheduled service, or is offered for a limited period of time.'" That describes local specialevent shuttles. "The intent of the law is to ensure that public transportation authorities subsidized by federal and local taxes do not unfairly compete with private companies to provide a service that is not purely for the benefit of the general public," said Allen.

But if a free shuttle taking children and families to the Fourth of July fireworks or holiday Trail of Lights at Zilker Park is not "purely for the benefit of the general public," then what in the name of bus service is?

Fred Gilliam, Capital Metro president/CEO, had been challenging staff for more than a year to find ways to work around the limitations, according to those present at meetings. But

he ultimately gave in and suspended the service last week. Because the shuttles have been provided free of charge (except for the UT football game service), they've been a money-loser for Capital Metro, which has recently moved to reduce or eliminate other financial drains, such as special service for the disabled. "ACL is the only event that we have been able to recover fully allocated costs from the event organizer, which allowed us to break even," said Allen. However, shuttles do increase ridership numbers, which in turn drive the agency's funding; in 2007, more than 260,000 riders used specialevent shuttles. Many are folks who don't regularly ride buses, so the shuttles have special marketing and outreach value as a "free sample," exposing new riders to transit.

According to Cap Metro's **Todd Hemingson**, staffs at transit agencies around the country have been holding conference calls together on the issue; no one wants to lose federal funds or get sued for noncompliance. "We're hearing stories from all over the U.S. about community services being trimmed because of this," said Hemingson. While aggressive interpretations of the federal guidelines are being discussed, he says he knows of no transit agency that has yet to set a precedent by successfully skirting them. "Everyone is waiting for some other city to be the guinea pig."

Cap Metro board member **Mike Martinez** is prepared to let our transit authority issue the first loud, assertive squeak of protest. Martinez has expressed enthusiastic interest in the vacant board chair position; he is favored by many to get the leadership nod. "The world is a different place than when these federal guidelines were adopted in 2005," he noted, referencing the rising price of gas and an overall shift away from America's gas-guzzling ways. Martinez believes it's imperative to expand transit services, not contract them. He also believes exacting specifications for the special-event shuttles could be legally written in such a way that the transit authority is the only viable provider: "There just isn't an entity out there that can provide the same service Capital Metro does."

As board chair, said Martinez, he would warmly encourage the transit authority to reverse itself and continue providing shuttles. "I'll ask for legal advice, then ask my colleagues to take a risk on this. If we get sued, we'll handle that." – *Katherine Gregor*

APD Jail first, questions later?

According to a report released Tuesday by a coalition of local advocates calling themselves **Austin Public Safety Solutions**, more than 36% of people arrested and booked into jail by Austin police in 2007 could instead have been issued a citation and released, saving city taxpayers at least \$5.4 million.

Of the 43,418 people arrested and booked into the Travis Co. jail last year, 9,902 were arrested on straight class C misdemeanors – everything from failure to wear a seat belt to possession of drug paraphernalia – which carry a maximum penalty of up to a \$500 fine but do not actually include the possibility of jail time. Also in 2007, APD officers arrested 5,910 people for nonviolent class A and B misdemeanors for which "cite-and-release" was an option – including driving with a suspended license, certain criminal mischief and graffiti violations, and possession of up to four ounces of marijuana.

Concerned about overcrowding in county jails and overburdened county budgets, state lawmakers last year enacted House Bill 2391 in order to give police the cite-and-release option for a slew of low-level offenses. Authored by Rep. **Jerry Madden**, R-Richardson, and carried by Sen. **Kel Seliger**, R-Amarillo, the bill received nearly unanimous support in both houses (only two voted against it) and was signed into law by Gov. **Rick Perry** on June 15. The policy was quickly adopted by several major law enforcement agencies – including the

Travis Co. Sheriff's Office. TCSO officials estimated that some 7,000 people were booked into jail in 2006 for offenses now listed under the new law. Most of the people would have qualified for cite-and-release, Sheriff's Office spokesman Roger Wade told us last summer, which would have saved the county about \$1.2 million. In reality, Wade said this week, the agency will likely see an "even bigger savings" when other cost factors – like the cost of gasoline – are included. "We are encouraging our folks to use it when they can," he said.


The law does not eliminate the possibility of eventual jail time for the class A and B

misdemeanor offenses – if convicted, a defendant could get up to six months in jail for a class B offense or up to a year in county jail for a class A offense. But the cite-and-release option allows officers the option of ticketing the accused, who then must appear before a magistrate court for a hearing on the charged offense before being released on a personal bond. Under the provisions of HB 2391, only people who have proper identification, have committed the offense in the county in which they live, and are not also facing more serious charges (or have outstanding warrants) are eligible for cite-and-release.

Moreover, police still retain their discretion to arrest for any of the listed offenses – particularly where they feel that there is "good cause shown" to do so (as in a situation where there is a risk that the person might injure himself/herself or someone else).

While TCSO has embraced the new law, the APD has not - last fall, police officials said they were "reviewing" it to see how it fit in with existing APD policy. Nearly 10 months after HB 2391 took effect, police brass are apparently still mulling it over. In May, APD Cmdr. Sean Mannix told the Chronicle that cite-and-release would create a policy problem: Specifically, that because APD has jurisdiction in three counties (Travis, plus Williamson and Havs, which encompass small areas of the city) and because two of the three counties weren't yet following the new law, in order to "maintain a consistent" policy citywide, APD had decided not to adopt the new law. Of course, since TCSO had already embraced the cite-and-release option, there was already a problem of inconsistent law enforcement policy.

When asked about cite-and-release during a May 14 council work session, APD Chief **Art Acevedo** said the department does follow cite-and-release for "some of the folks if we can [positively] identify them" (as required under the law), but the problem was "with marijuana" and that Hays and Williamson



county authorities wouldn't abide by citeand-release for minor pot possession. On Tuesday, however, APD Lt. **Donald Baker** said that Acevedo (who is out of town this week) is (now, apparently) planning to get all the law enforcement stakeholders together in Austin's three counties for a "roundtable" talk about what it would take to implement a consistent policy for the whole area – "so we can look at everybody's needs and look at the most effective way to do this," he said. Among the questions – still pending after nearly a year – are how to make sure that persons receiving citations know exactly when and where to report to court. The

Police Department hasn't acted on any of this in the last year, Baker says, because of other priorities – including departmental reorganization and retooling important policies on use of force. But, he said, "It's definitely been on our radar."

According to numbers gathered from APD by the new Austin Public Safety Solutions coalition – which includes members of the **ACLU** and the **LULAC** – it isn't clear whether police have availed themselves of the cite-and-release option since it took effect Sept. 1, 2007. That contradicts Acevedo's May assertion – though it is hard to determine from the data APD provided how many people might have avoided jail if the Police Department had adopted the option in a timely manner. In all of 2007, 1,393 people were arrested and jailed for minor pot possession, 543 for criminal mischief, 68 for graffiti, 2,294 for driving without a valid license, and 1,608 for theft of less



than \$500 – all offenses covered by HB 2391. But the raw numbers don't reflect how many of these arrestees would meet the other conditions of the law.

The cost of processing low-level arrestees into the criminal justice system is high - not only to the individual, burdened with an arrest record even if never convicted (which can negatively effect employment and housing options), but also to taxpayers. Data provided by APD reflects that taxpayers spend at least \$342.94 for each person arrested and booked into jail a total that includes not only the basic booking cost (\$104.45 per arrest), the cost for fingerprinting (\$10.56 per arrest), and the cost of magistration (\$17.45 per person), but also manpower costs, which, conservatively, add up to about \$125.17 per arrest. Even this is likely a low-ball number, however. The data APD provided is based on the salary of one three-year-veteran officer (relatively low on the pay scale) completing the arrest-and-book process in just three hours, the "best practices average." APSS argues that APD doesn't monitor for best practices and "tends to use one or two officers" for each arrest, which they "conservatively" estimate at \$195.30 in offi cer time for each arrest. Factoring in all four costs - booking, printing, officer salary, and magistration - the APD spent about \$5.4 million in 2007 to jail 15,812 low-level nonviolent offenders. (In 2006, the department arrested slightly more people on the same charges, spending roughly \$5.5 million.) These figures are certainly low estimates, as they do not include either the true cost of manpower nor any of the additional jail or court costs that come out of the Travis County budget.

Given the stresses on the city's budget, "if we really want to be fiscally responsible, we have to have all these options on the table," said **Austin Police Association** Vice President Wuthipong "Tank" Tantaksinanukij. "This is really talking about, in reality, expanding the resources available to officers. We're open to anything that will help us do the job better and free up the manpower of our officers." — Jordan Smith



Officer Cleared in Dog Shooting

An internal investigation has cleared an **Austin Park Police** officer of wrongdoing in the May 26 shooting of a dog at **Emma Long Metropolitan Park**. The investigation, conducted by the city's Public Safety and Emergency Management Department's Professional Standards Division, concluded that Officer **Johnny Wooldridge** acted within Park Police guidelines for use of force when he shot a female dog, described as a pit bull, three times.

A July 3 memorandum outlining the investigation found that a park visitor had approached the dog, which was chained to a lawn chair, to pet her and that the dog bit the visitor on the hand. The visitor's mother-in-law called 911, and Wooldridge responded. When Wooldridge and a park employee approached the dog's family, the memo states, the dog – named **Naive** – stood up, growled, and charged them. According to the memo, Wooldridge shot the dog three times after she lunged at the park employee. A final shot, delivered four to five minutes later, killed the dog after her owner, **Juan Moreno**, asked the officer to put the dog out of her misery, the memo states.

The memo quotes Moreno as saying that Naive was tethered at the time of the shooting. However, investigators concluded that she had come loose from her chain. The investigation found that Wooldridge's gun was pointed toward the ground when he fired it and that the risk of human injury from his shots was minimal. It also concluded that use of a Taser stun gun would have been ineffective, because Wooldridge was not within the Taser's optimum range of 7 to 15 feet from the dog. – Laurel Chesky

CONTROVERSIAL SEWAGE CASE IN STATE'S HANDS

A contested case hearing between representatives of a Hays County subdivision and stakeholder opponents, including the city of Austin, ended on Friday after a week of testimony before two administrative law judges. At issue is a proposal by the Belterra subdivision to discharge up to roughly 350,000 gallons of treated effluent into Bear Creek, which ultimately feeds Barton Springs. Prior to the hearing, four other parties - the Barton Springs/Edwards Aquifer Conservation District, the Hays Trinity Groundwater Conservation District, the city of Dripping Springs, and the Lower Colorado River Authority - reached a settlement agreement with the developer. The city of Austin, Hays County, and downstream landowners compose the protesting parties.

Their case rests on two paragraphs of the Texas Administrative Code, which state that significant surface-water degradation can only occur when it is necessary to promote social and economic development. Despite the state-of-the-art treatment plant that the applicants propose, the opponents relied on computer modeling by the city of Austin and expert testimony – most importantly from environmental engineer **Lial Tischler** who, said Stuart Henry, a lawyer for the landowners, "pretty well said anything they try to do ... will degrade the existing high quality of water on Bear Creek." **Chris Herrington**, a senior programming analyst with the city of Austin, explained the computer modeling he ran, which indicated the proposed discharge would increase nutrient levels in the creek, leading to algae blooms, then an increase in dissolved oxygen, and ultimately, Henry said, "the Barton Springs salamander will likely be harmed."

David Frederick, an attorney representing Hays County, assessed the opposition: "I think the applicants tried a good case. I just think it's like playing cards: If you don't have good cards ... you still, in the end, normally can't prevail." Frederick contended that the essential data was in their favor: "There's no way around the fact that there's going to be a lot more nutrients dumped in this creek if there is a wastewater plant as opposed to if there's not a wastewater plant. And you can't make that fact go away."

Both sides will submit their final written arguments Sept. 8. The judges will read over them and by October should recommend a course of action – denying the permit, allowing it, or allowing it with certain stipulations – to the **Texas Commission on Environmental Quality**. The TCEQ is expected to decide the case by the end of the year. – Jacob Cottingham

Students Weigh In on Streetcar

Will UT students organize as vocal Austin streetcar advocates? At a campus meeting recently, the UT student group **Urban Development Society** asked **Capital Metro** representative **Matt Curtis** about immediate plans to expand regional public transportation and rail transit options. The meeting generated a front-page story in *The Daily Texan* and an offer from **UT student government** leaders to help organize broader pro-transit advocacy on campus.

"With fuel costs soaring and environmental damage associated with autos mounting, we need to unite all UT students looking to get rail-transit options, sooner rather than later," said UDS officer **Greg Anderson**. "Our great city is a leader in so many ways; it is time for us to catch up in the one place where even Houston and Dallas have us beat." He expressed frustration that the Central Austin streetcar circulator once headed for a November voter referendum appears stalled.

UT urban design professor **Sinclair Black** presented a ridership rationale to UDS for why the proposed streetcar route through the UT campus should run along Speedway (or possibly Guadalupe), not along San Jacinto as the administration insists. Also on hand to hear from students were Glenn Gadbois of the **Alliance for Public Transportation** and Jim Adams and Jana McCann of **ROMA Austin** (which will present its streetcar recommendations to City Council July 24).

UDS is organizing another meet-up for Wednesday, Sept. 10, 6-7:30pm, at the Texas Union on the UT campus, to unite more UT students in advocacy for transit and sustainable urban development. - Katherine Gregor



The November Election Sizing up the campaign war chests

Last week's "Naked City" reported on the contribution and expenditure reports on congressional races of importance to Austinites, noting that the deck seems to be stacked against Democrat **Rick Noriega**'s challenge to U.S. Sen. **John Cornyn** (whose war chest is almost 10 times larger than his), and in Congressional District 10 (Austin to Houston), Democrat **Larry Joe Doherty** is keeping pace with incumbent **Michael McCaul** in donations (both took in about a quarter of a million, plus McCaul threw in \$60,000 more of his own money).

More of the July 15 reports have since been posted, allowing deeper analyses of local races:

• Here's an interesting tidbit: Who's giving to McCaul and Doherty? For LJD, 84% comes from individuals, while only 3% comes from political action committees. Much different story for McCaul: 57% from individuals, 36% from political action committees.

• That race is a stark contrast to District 31 (far North Austin up to Stephenville), where the \$12,595 raised by Democrat **Brian Ruiz** this quarter is just a 10th of what Rep. **John Carter** garnered. Cash on hand: Carter, \$274,233; Ruiz (*gulp*), \$1,056.

• It's really interesting to see how certain seats in the area that once favored Republicans, or were at least highly competitive, have apparently been given up for dead by the GOP. Remember in 2002 when upstart Democrat **Patrick Rose** narrowly unseated right-wing ideologue state Rep. Rick Green by a mere 335 votes in District 45 (Hays, Blanco, and Caldwell counties)? Rose now appears entrenched: He's sitting on a bank balance of \$807,809, while Republican opponent **Matt Young** has a piddling \$27,272.

• Similarly, Dem incumbent **Donna Howard** in District 48 (once the property of Todd Baxter) has \$160,868 available to pummel the \$11,266 of **Pam Waggoner**. Rep. **Mark Strama**, who barely took down Republican Jack Stick in District 50 in 2004, has only \$53,784 to play with, but that looks huge compared to challenger **Jerry Mikus**' \$2,436. A little more competitive is District 47 (southwest Travis Co.), long a stronghold of former GOP Rep. Terry Keel: Democratic incumbent **Valinda Bolton** has raised \$120,016 since the beginning of the year (\$86,323 still on hand), but Terry's sister-in-law **Donna Keel** rounded up a respectable \$49,261 (\$34,430 on hand).

• The big shocker: District 52, long the Williamson County fortress of the GOP's **Mike Krusee** (who is stepping down), looks highly competitive. We expect more Republican dollars to start rolling in to shore up reserves **Bryan Daniel** had to spend winning a fourway primary, but right now the \$41,432 he raised this year (\$32,421 on hand) looks pretty paltry against the \$138,869 (\$129,740 on hand) brought in by Democrat **Diana Maldonado**. Perhaps all those liberals who are getting priced out of the Austin housing market are turning Williamson blue?

• At the Travis County level, Dem **Karen Huber** better get on the stick with fundraising if she really wants to take the lone Republican out of the Commissioners Court. She raised \$52,813 (including \$10,000 from her husband), but her remaining \$38,248 looks to get stomped by **Gerald Daugherty**'s \$288,289. Unless donors start giving big, she'll have to rely on Obama's coattails in November. — *Lee Nichols*

NEW EVIDENCE COULD CLEAR DEATH ROW INMATE RODNEY REED

In a writ filed with the Court of Criminal Appeals on July 16, attorneys for death row inmate **Rodney Reed** are arguing that new evidence uncovered about the conduct of victim **Stacey Stites**' police officer fiancé bolsters Reed's claim of innocence.

Reed was convicted of the 1996 murder of Stites as she drove to work for an early-morning shift at the Bastrop HEB on April 23, 1996. Although DNA evidence on Stites' body eventually led investigators to Reed, who acknowledged having an affair with Stites, no other evidence tied Reed to the crime. Reed's supporters have long argued that Stites' fiancé, **Jimmy Fennell Jr.**, was a far more likely suspect because he was upset about Reed and Stites' relationship.

Fennell, who most recently worked as a Georgetown Police officer, was indicted last year on charges including **aggravated sexual assault** and **kidnapping** related to his raping a woman he had taken into custody. Last month he agreed to plead guilty to two charges in exchange for two years in a state jail facility, but that plea deal was denied by Williamson Co. District Judge Burt Carnes, and Fennell will now go to trial in September.

In addition, Reed's attorney Bryce Benjet writes that information obtained from the Travis Co. Sheriff's Office demonstrates that Fennell was accused of trying to **force a woman to dance for him naked** back in 2004 after he pulled her over near Round Rock for having a "crooked license plate." Fennell's criminal attorney, Bob Phillips, told the *Austin American-Statesman* that Benjet is "becoming desperate" and that making such allegations public "has the potential to taint any jury pool" in Fennell's sex assault case, "whether the allegations are true, false, reckless or utterly unfounded."

The latest court filing also notes that Fennell has demonstrated a disturbing propensity for sexual violence on his personal **MySpace** page, where he goes by the name "Point Man." Notably, one posted picture shows a woman from behind bending over the back of a car – the same position in which Fennell's rape victim reported being assaulted last fall. – *Jordan Smith*

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news **Northeast Alliance Rejects Housing Project**

The Northeast Austin Business and Community Alliance, a group said to represent 11 Northeast neighborhood associations and 10 nearby businesses, held a press conference Monday to request that council postpone its deci-

sion on rezoning 5908 Manor Rd. in Windsor Park. The Community Partnership for the Homeless has proposed the property be rezoned from higher-density single-family homes to Mixed Use, to allow for a 110-unit affordable supportive-housing complex. The zoning issue is scheduled to go before council today (Thursday).

Paul Saldaña, a former council aide and public relations professional (Adelánte Solutions) hired to represent

the alliance, said they want the decision postponed until after Julv 31, when the Texas Department of Housing and

Community Affairs will decide whether to grant Community Partnership tax credits to fund the project. The alliance also challenged the city to adopt a policy ensuring low-income

housing projects are distributed "equitably" throughout Austin, rather than concentrated east of I-35.

"Our vision [for the parcel] in our neighborhood plan, which has yet to be a year old, was at the very highest, single-family

homes with commercial properties on the roadside," said alliance member Scooter Cheatham. "We're trying to build a neighborhood and to recover from a downward spiral in business." Speakers at the press conference, held at the site (currently a private park), said they believe the project will attract crime and negatively affect the quality of life in the area.

The project is opposed by neighboring landowners and would require a supermajority council vote (at least six of seven) to override the neighbors' petition against it.

According to the opponents, Council Member Mike Martinez has indicated he will vote against the project. Community Partnership for the Homeless hopes to postpone the zoning issue no later than City Council's Aug. 7 meeting to ensure the project will be able to secure funding. Lvdia Crafts

Cover America Uncovering Health-Care Horrors

The Cover America Tour, a campaign to highlight the need for health-care reform, made a stop in Austin Thursday at the People's Community Clinic as part of its mission to document stories of people who have been abandoned by the nation's health-care system.

Austin not only marks the halfway point in the cross-country RV trip; it also represents a significant stop on the tour, given Texas' No. 1 ranking for having the highest percentage of uninsured residents. Since setting out from New York in May, the tour has received thousands of letters from people eager to voice their health insurance woes - and many of those have been from Texans.

Austin state Rep. Elliott Naishtat and Regina Rogoff, CEO of the People's Community Clinic, were two of the health-care reform advocates on hand to welcome Cover America to Austin. In his remarks, Naishtat called for universal health care and criticized the state's recent proposal to expand the controversial computer enrollment system - called the Texas Integrated Eligibility Redesign System - that handles Medicaid cases. "I'm concerned this recent proposal could result in more people losing coverage," he said. "I believe this system is untested and flawed."

Rogoff talked about the challenges of providing medical services for the thousands of uninsured and underinsured Central Texans. People's Community Clinic serves as the primary healthcare provider for 11,000 people and is the largest independent health-care clinic in Austin. At times, however, the clinic has no choice but to turn patients away due to a lack of resources, Rogoff said. Linda Cannon, who receives treatment at the facility for a thyroid condition, said she was fortunate to be admitted to the clinic when she lost her job and health insurance. Without the Community Clinic, Cannon said, she would have trouble surviving. "If I miss two or three days of my medication, I start feeling horrible and can't even move," she said.

Cover America has so far collected 45 stories and still has 23 more states to visit. The tour will end in Washington, D.C., where the video footage will be used as a tool to lobby officials for healthcare reform. "People expect horror stories," said Meg Bohne, campaign organizer for Consumers Union. "But what we've found is that this is a slow-moving catastrophe. People are just trying to get coverage and living in constant fear." - L.C.

FCC OVERRULED ON 'WARDROBE **MALFUNCTION' FINE**

Invoking something resembling common sense, a federal appeals court Monday slapped down the Federal Communications Commission for imposing a \$550,000 fine in the wake of Janet Jackson's boob pop during the halftime show of the 2004 Super Bowl. The 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals overruled the FCC's penalty, noting that the commission had "acted arbitrarily and capriciously" when it deviated, without warning, from its 30-yearold policy of ignoring the "fleeting" and unintentional incidents that occasionally pop up on television.

The FCC leaped into action after Justin Timberlake's shocking tug at Jackson's bustier, giving 90 million viewers with magnifying lenses a split-second glimpse of Jackson's nipple. The ensuing hysteria added the terms "Nipplegate'

and "wardrobe malfunction" to the lexicon and became a symbol of the influence of the religious right in the Bush administration.

The FCC reportedly received more than 500,000 complaints about the incident, the vast majority of which, it turned out, were generated by self-appointed "watchdog" groups like the Parents Television Council.

Nevertheless, the FCC tried to make an example of CBS for its moral degeneration in broadcasting Jackson's breast, even


though the network denied prior knowledge of Jackson and Timberlake's dastardly scheme.

Noting that the incident centered on a "nine-sixteenths of one second glimpse of a bare female breast," the Court of Appeals ruled that the FCC can "change its policies" without judicial second-guessing, but "it cannot change a well-established course of action without supplying notice of and a reasoned explanation for its policy departure."

In a statement, CBS said it hoped the decision "will lead the FCC to return to the policy of restrained indecency enforcement it followed for decades." But the FCC appears undeterred. FCC Chairman Kevin Martin said he was "surprised" by the decision and "disappointed for families and parents." A similar case is headed for the Supreme Court later this year, where the new Republican-appointed majority will have a chance to make its own statement about the government's role in regulating TV morality.

THE IRAQ OIL RUSH

Have you noticed lately that George W.'s Iraq adventure has turned out to be ... well, oily?

For years, the Bush-Cheney regime decried any suggestion that its invasion had anything to do with helping Big Oil get its hands on Iraq's wealth of crude. No, no, they insisted, it's about WMD ... or al Qaeda ... or democracy - not oil. However, in this final year of their reign, the Bushites are blatantly pushing an oil agenda.

First, they've been trying to squeeze a law out of the Iraqi government that would allow the likes of ExxonMobil to control the country's massive, undeveloped oil fields. Unsurprisingly, the Iraqi people have balked since these reserves are their chief national asset, not only representing future wealth but also their sovereignty.

Then came news that Iraq's U.S.-backed government has issued no-bid contracts to five Western oil giants, authorizing them to prepare some existing oil fields for commercial production. This special deal gives the Exxons a leg up on winning long-term licenses to privatize Iraq's massive reserves, yet the Bushites said they played no role in this. But - whoops - now it's been revealed that a team of administration lawyers and privatesector consultants had quietly helped draft the no-bid contracts.

Meanwhile, up pops Ray Hunt, the billionaire CEO of Hunt Oil Co. and a longtime political crony of George W. It seems he cut a special deal with one of Iraq's regional governments to develop oil fields there. This move violates U.S. policy and is considered illegal by Iraq's central government, so the Bushites claimed not to have known about Hunt's end run. But whoops again - internal documents have been uncovered showing that the Bush team not only knew about the deal but welcomed it. Despite their denials, Bush & Co. are

covered in crude.

CORPORATIZING THE POLITICAL CONVENTIONS

Since John McCain claims to be a robust reformer of big money politics and since Barack Obama flatly refuses to accept political action committee money, the fat cat corporate givers who have ruled presidential politics for years must be shut out this time, right?

Uh ... hardly. For example, check out the forthcoming Republican and Democratic conventions. A convenient loophole in campaign finance law allows unlimited sums of specialinterest money to be drawn directly from corporate coffers and handed to the "host committees" for this summer's political hurrahs in Denver and St. Paul. Minn. In turn, the top executives and lobbyists for corporations that give will get special access to the candidates, lawmakers, and other key officials during the weeklong schmooze fests.

This is not a cheap ticket. Both host committees "suggest" that sponsors donate in the \$1 million to \$5 million range, with the most intimate access going to those who give the most. But the face time that these favor-seekers get is priceless.

That's why more than a hundred brandname corporations - from Aflac health insurance company to Xerox - have already signed up, including 25 swingers that are sponsoring both conventions. More than \$100 million has been contributed. Drug companies, telecom giants, automakers, Wall Street bankers, airlines, and others with business pending in Washington are front and center, eager to show the next president and congressional leaders that they're "on the team."

It's offensive enough that these monied interests can slap their logos all over our political process, but offense turns to disgust when you realize that the corporations are allowed to deduct these favor-buying dollars from their income taxes, meaning you and I subsidize this corrupt system.

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Texas Fiction Science

The State Board of Education does its part to fantasize biology

There's nothing the evil overlords of the fictional future like more than a nice, healthy round of brainwashing. Whether it's George Orwell's totalitarian government of Oceania thwarting rebellious citizens in 1984, the "conditioning" of children in Brave New World, or the large-scale human reprogramming in The Matrix, mind control is all the rage for governments looking to cultivate a herd of submissive subjects. And it's so simple, too! All that's necessary are a few moldable minds and a strict party line.

But here's a bit of nonfiction: The Texas State Board of Education has just those two things. Moldable minds, in the form of Texas schoolchildren, and a party line that favors teaching the "weaknesses" of biological evolutionary theory and, by implication, the strengths of the latest pseudo-scholarly variation on creationism: "intelligent design." Last fall, in the latest episode of that eternal Texas struggle, the Texas Education Agency, which is regulated by the SBOE, fired its science

director for distributing information about a proevolution seminar. And now, the SBOE is beginning hearings on updated science curricula that teaches the "strengths and weaknesses" of evolutionary theory.

It's the latest in an everevolving effort by religious conservatives to discredit evolution after efforts to explicitly incorporate intelligent design have repeatedly failed. Lessons

in Weak Evolution could be coming to a Texas public school near you by March 2009.

McLeroy vs. Biology

The first of several hearings on the science curricula updates occurred July 17 and 18, with this first meeting dedicated only to the delicate bureaucratic process of planning on how to plan those updates. According to SBOE chair and College Station dentist Dr. Don McLeroy, this year's "battle is to bring in some of the weaknesses of evolution," to ninth- and 10th-grade biology classrooms,

really just one singular theory that gets the critical treatment.

"The only theory they attack is evolution," said Dan Quinn, Texas Freedom Network's communications director. Heliocentricity, gravitational theory, and atomic structure all get the SBOE thumbs-up. Indeed, despite clearly worded endorsements of evolution's validity as scientific fact from the National Academy of Sciences, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Science Teachers Association of Texas, and countless other scientific groups, McLeroy and six other conservative members of the 15-member SBOE remain unconvinced.

"I don't think the evidence supports [evolution]," said McLeroy, a self-described creationist who believes that because "science is always trying to find problems with stuff," evolution should not be presented as absolute fact. In McLeroy's opinion, there are three major weaknesses of evolutionary the-

ory that schoolchildren should be made aware of. He arrived at these conclusions by "reading everything [he] could get [his] hands on" and listening to podcasts.

First weakness: the fossil record. "There are gaps," said McLeroy, that do not include enough transitional forms of life to support evolution. Second, McLeroy says there has simply not been enough time on Earth

for the minute changes required by evolution to have taken place. Thirdly, McLeroy says the incredible complexity of cells proves divine design. Information contained in the genetic code is just too mind-blowing to have come from anywhere but an intelligent creator. "Where did this information come from?" McLeroy mused. McLeroy would like to see these assertions and more taught in Texas biology classrooms.

"demonstrates an extraordinary ignorance of biology," since rates of evolution observed in laboratory tests have been "more than sufficient" to prove natural rates of genetic change that coincide with the fossil record.

Finally, McLeroy's cell-complexity argument does not even belong in a scientific discussion, wrote Hillis: "The argument that 'It is too complicated, so God must have done it' is not a scientific argument."

And yet it appears that, all evidence

retaining language requiring that teachers instruct

students in the "strengths and weaknesses" of scientific theories. But according to the Texas Freedom Network, a statewide organization that works to mitigate the influence of fundamentalism on state policy, it's

Sciences, about McLeroy's list of "weaknesses." In an e-mail exchange, Hillis said McLeroy was simply denying facts. "There is indeed a vast record of transitional fossils," wrote Hillis, saying McLeroy's fossil record claims are "completely at odds with the experts in the entire field of paleontology."

As for McLeroy's second assertion regarding length of time required for evolution to have taken place, Hillis wrote that the position taught in Texas as a weak theory. Since the SBOE has a near majority of anti-evolution members, the small problem of evolution actually being demonstrable scientific knowledge is only a political challenge to those who want schoolchildren taught otherwise.

Forward Into the Past

McLeroy says he and his board allies can persuade the swing votes necessary to give the board a good chance of advancing a weakevolution curricula. Indeed, the persuasion skills of the conservative seven have already been demonstrated earlier this year, when Texas' English standards were revised. In May, the SBOE rejected the recommendations of an \$85,000, two-year study conducted by English teachers and curriculum experts in favored

by McLeroy and his fellow conservatives. It was submitted just prior to adoption, without time for board or public review, yet passed with a contentious 9-6 vote.

The board's dominance by anti-evolution sentiment, coupled with conservative Republican rule at the Capitol, has had a direct effect on agency policy. Last November, TEA Director of Science Chris Comer was forced to resign after she forwarded an e-mail to academic groups containing information about an anti-creationism seminar. The e-mail, which contained a one-line "FYI" from Comer

and a forwarded event listing, was considered an inappropriate endorsement of evolution by TEA officials. They insist Comer's effective termination was simply a personnel matter involving an employee unwilling to follow agency policy and that evolution has nothing to do with it.

Earlier this month, Comer filed a federal lawsuit against the TEA and its official policy of "neutrality" on the subject of creationism. Comer alleges that the agency policy is a violation of the First Amendment. Because creationism is a religious belief, her pleadings state, "The [TEA's] 'neutrality' policy has the purpose or effect of endorsing religion." In the lawsuit, Comer asks to be reinstated to her position as the TEA science director.

It's worth noting that part of the TEA and SBOE's duty statement includes a goal to 'prepare today's schoolchildren for a successful future." If the weak-evolution curricula passes, Texas schoolchildren will be able to achieve that success in one of two ways: fly out of state for biology class and be back in time for lunch or set their sights on excelling at Jerry Falwell's Liberty University.

Texas Freedom Network's Dan Quinn believes weak-evolution curricula will set back the education of Texas schoolchildren. He says Texas will have a hard time getting its high school graduates admitted to top universities, or attracting science-oriented businesses, if it develops an anti-science reputation.

"Are we going to give our kids a 19th century education in the 21st century?" Quinn asked. If the SBOE has its way, the answer is likely to be yes.





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One Quadrillion and Then Some

It sounds like science fiction, but it ain't

It was Monday, March 31.

An early spring morning in Austin, still reminiscent of the cool rains of February but with just a hint of the warming, dreadful, soonto-be-ungodly summer days to come.

South by Southwest had come and gone, and 60,000 University of Texas students had returned to reclaim their city from that festival's weeklong parade of international hipsters. All over campus, they went about their morning business: riding buses, texting on their cell phones, moving through classrooms, libraries, and coffee shops.

Little did any of them know – little *could* any of them know – what was about to rumble beneath their feet on that crisp morning. Who could be aware of the enormity of what was about to transpire in the bowels of the Robert Lee Moore Hall at the corner of Dean Keeton and Speedway, home of university subdepartments with vaguely sinister names: the Fusion Research Center, the Center for Nonlinear Dynamics, the Center for Complex Quantum Systems, and the infinitely cryptic (and possibly irreligious) Center for Relativity?

Who would have thought that on that day and on that corner and in that basement, history would be made? Important history. Frightening history. History as large as the universe.

On that cool morning in March, with the world going about its quiet, insignificant business, the single biggest explosion of light and heat and energy the universe had seen since its birth was about to take place.

Few knew of it. No one could stop it. *Boom!*

Meet the Mastermind

Professor Todd Ditmire is in the dirty business of making high-peak-power light pulses. *Very* high-peak-power. As the director of UT-Austin's High Intensity Laser Science Group, Ditmire is in charge of the most powerful laser in the world, a machine capable of producing a *petawatt* of energy. That's one quadrillion watts –forthose keeping tabs, 1,000,000,000,000,000. To provide a little perspective, the power output of the entire U.S. electrical grid is about half a trillion watts. The petawatt laser residing in the basement of the RLM building produces 2,000 *times* that amount.

Here's another way to think about it: Light intensity is a measurement of power per unit of area. Sunlight on the surface of the Earth can produce about a watt of power per square centimeter. The petawatt laser, meanwhile, produces light intensity 20 orders of magnitude brighter than that. Imagine a magnifying glass half the size of Texas focusing all the sunlight hitting the Earth on a spot a tenth of the size of a human hair. So, on March 31 Ditmire and his team of graduate students and professors and other mad geniuses brought all that power to bear on unsuspecting humanity for one brief moment, a moment that created more energy than courses through the mighty United States ... and more heat than resides at the center of the sun.

Time Is on Our Side

Surely death and destruction and global ruin were soon to follow.

Maybe not. It was not a giant stream of light like in the movies – say, *Independence Day* or *War of the Worlds* – shooting through walls, destroying national landmarks, and generally wreaking havoc on helpless citizens or invading hordes in a wild streak of neon blue. The petawatt laser, despite being the most powerful laser in the world (or rather because of it), is only capable of producing its light and energy in extremely shorts bursts. Cosmically, insanely short bursts. Shortness that's nearly impossible for us to wrap our heads around.

Power, you see, is energy per unit of time. The more temporally concentrated a burst of energy is, the more powerful it is. So in order to create a petawatt of energy, Ditmire and his team had to both squash their light beam down to a very narrow point and produce it for a very short amount of time. These "pulses" only last for a matter of femtoseconds.

A femtosecond is one-millionth of a nanosecond. In analogical terms, a femtosecond is to one minute as a minute is to the age of the universe ... give or take a few abstractions and intellectual leaps of faith.

Besides, Ditmire and his fellow high-intensity laser scientists aren't interested in destruction or domination or even defense. Their petawatt laser is a means of understanding the universe. By bouncing the light through an intricate series of mirrors, optics, gratings, and amplifiers, they're able to create what is essentially the world's largest magnifying glass, focusing light to peak intensities and generating enough heat to simulate exotic astrophysical states that – up until this point – they've only been able to speculate about: What happens to matter at the center of the sun? What is the true nature of a brown dwarf? Is it possible to create matter from nothing? Can we return it if it doesn't fit?

In other words, they are creating a mock-up of the universe in a lab ... in Austin ... approx-

imately five blocks east of the Slices & Ices pizza stand.

One burst of radiation at a time.

The Vacuum Cleaner

a millimeter thick.

Meanwhile, on the other side of Dean Keeton, development proceeds on a different kind of futuristic laser technology. On the seventh floor of the Engineering Teaching Center, in the heart of the Department of Mechanical Engineering, in a dark lab filled with eager young men, their faces wan from long days and months spent behind protective black curtains, assistant professor Adela Ben-Yakar is building the world's first flexible laser microscalpel. Like Ditmire's petawatt laser, Ben-Yakar's scalpel uses high-energy light pulses that burst for mere femtoseconds. Unlike Ditmire's petawatt laser, however, Ben-Yakar's scalpel doesn't stretch out for hundreds of feet in different directions. It is just a simple black box about 2 inches by 1 inch by 1 inch: a tiny miracle filled with mirrors, optics, amplifiers, and lenses, each barely half

Let's say an oncologist is operating on a patient diagnosed with brain cancer. As things stand now, a successful operation will end with the removal of any and all tumors. After these tumors are removed, however, there will most likely still be cancer cells among the healthy material in the brain that surgeons won't want to touch because they're too small to work on and too difficult to find, to get to them would require the removal and destruction of too much healthy matter, resulting in further damage to the brain and thus severe, even deadly, consequences.

Enter Ben-Yakar's magical laser microscalpel. Using high-peak energy in short bursts of extremely high heat, with a laser beam that can

So he's throwing out these ideas like: What if a building could do what a tree can do and sequester carbon and produce water and oxygen, or what if cars are carbonpositive? He flips this whole environmental/ technological conundrum on its head.'

focus to less than half a micron (or 0.00004 inches), this microscalpel will allow surgeons to ionize - or vaporize - cancer cells with unprecedented accuracy and without damaging surrounding healthy tissue. One surgeon has taken to calling Ben-Yakar's innovation the "vacuum cleaner."

Looking inside Ben-Yakar's microscalpel is like observing Ditmire's mighty petawatt project in miniature: just as impressive but not nearly as imposing. Narrow, low-divergence light pulses, channeled through exotic new photonic crystal fibers with air-guiding holes, bounce off two mirrors, then focus through one lens before rediffusing through another, followed by a trip between two more mirrors before finally refocusing for their trip out of the scalpel and into living tissue. Meanwhile, another light provides visibility inside the tiny, dark caverns of the endoscopic minefield of the human body, while a camera sends images back through the scalpel, providing surgeons with the ability to see, onscreen, that which they had never seen - much less operated on - before.

Yes, it's an endoscopic laser microscalpel, a light source, and an imaging camera all in one! A multiuse, high-powered medical miracle! A miniature revelation of modern science!

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

Chuck Yeager's quarters were the back-to-back neighbors of the yard in which I played as a child growing up at Edwards Air Force Base (in the middle of the Mojave Desert), while my father was the commander of the U-2 project that eventually took the pictures of the Cuban missiles of the time that has since become known as the Cuban Missile

Crisis. The designer of

the U-2 - Kelly Johnson of Skunk Works project of Lockheed - would visit with the pilots about the new aircraft in our home. My Sundayschool teacher was Mrs. Borman, whose husband, Frank, was part of the three-man crew that walked on the moon (on my birthday!). So I maintained a steady diet of The Twilight Zone (never missed an episode) and any future-focused book/

movie/comic that I could get my hands on – Jules Verne chief among them. The odd twist here is that, given the fact that I was growing up around the birth of the space project and aerial reconnaissance, I had a tendency to take in these materials much more as fact than fiction! A great way to grow up, minus the rattlesnakes that were also part of life.

Brazilian Guitar Quartet Capturing the unexpected

For most of us noninstrumentalists, the word "guitar" evokes the sounds and images of popular music: folksingers playing acoustic solos; heavy metalists playing so hard, fast, and loud that they seem to set their instruments on fire; or the Edge commanding a stage despite the presence of an overwrought. overacting Bono. Or perhaps, if you're like me, the word "guitar" most immediately recalls memories of lessons taken above a pharmacy in a small town in Connecticut, making numerous failed attempts at playing Beatles standards in the early Seventies. As Austin Classical Guitar Society Executive Director Matthew Hinsley pointedly says, "The guitar is the ubiquitous pop instrument of the world." But while many if not most of us consciously consider the guitar a modern instrument, its origins reach far back to the mid-18th century, and you'll find those origins palpably embodied should you attend this week's performance by the Brazilian Guitar Quartet, hosted by the Austin Classical Guitar Society, in cooperation with the Austin Chamber Music Center.

The ACGS has been around, in one form or another, since the Sixties, but it's made its presence felt most keenly over the last five years, both in performance, hosting practically every well-known classical guitarist in the world, including John Williams, Pepe Romero, and Christopher Parkening, and in education, through its outreach program, which this year will be in residence at 12 Austin-area schools, teaching more than 600 students. Perhaps most impressively, the ACGS is the largest classical guitar organization in the country, and the performance of the Brazilian Guitar Quartet is the latest feather in its organizational cap.

"One of the strengths of the classical guitar," says Hinsley, "is that it is involved with so many diverse genres. Roland Dyens writes jazz-inspired and even avant-garde music for classical guitar. Carlo Domeniconi writes music that combines Turkish harmony and rhythm with Western rock & roll. Tangos, like those of Astor Piazzolla, are increasingly programmed as concert music for all instruments, not just the guitar. Historically there's a strong romantic classical guitar tradition throughout the 19th century, and so we have analogs to Schubert, Schumann, and Chopin. And it has a particularly strong presence in Spanish, Italian, and German repertoires."

And while all you'll see onstage is four guitarists, playing in such exquisite harmony that they sound like one instrument, you may think the instrument you're hearing is not a guitar but a harpsichord or even a piano. "I think some musicians quite consciously imitate a harpsichord when they play certain types of music on the guitar," says Hinsley. "Guitar belongs in the harpsichord, piano, and harp family, and one of the most unique things about the ensemble is that they have two eight-stringed instruments. So you hear some notes in ranges that you don't often hear on guitars, because they've got one extra-low string and one extra-high string. And when you get four guitars playing together, two of which have an extended range, you can capture the unexpected." - Barry Pineo

Days of Future Past

The history of Salvage Vanguard Theater's unlikely sci-fi success, 'The Intergalactic Nemesis'

It was just supposed to be a spring fling. Hip young theatre company that built its rep staging edgy contemporary dramas in bars flirts with old-fashioned radio serials in a coffee shop. Nobody involved had any high expectations for this lark of a show. It was going to be a few weeks, a few laughs, then a quick kiss goodbye. Yet here it is, 12 years later, and that show, The Intergalactic Nemesis, is still feeling the love. Salvage Vanguard Theater's affectionate spoof of the cliff-hangers of yesteryear, performed in the manner of a radio drama, with actors holding scripts in front of microphones and sound effects provided live by Foley artists, has become one of Austin's rare theatrical sensations: a hit with audiences from the first performance, which has had multiple revivals, spawned two sequels, and toured across the country. From a java joint that holds a few dozen people to theatrical palaces seating more than 2,000, The Intergalactic Nemesis has boldly gone where no play – at least no Austincreated play that sends up radio serials - has gone before. And to make matters stranger, it's a work of science fiction, a genre whose stage successes can pretty much be summed up by Karel Čapek's R.U.R. and The Rocky Horror Show. If ever there were an unlikely theatrical hit, this would seem to be it. So what's the story?

Flashback to 1996: Tom Cruise, still years from using Oprah's couch as a trampoline, is enjoying boffo box office for Mission: Impossible, and the nation is afflicted with the musical virus called the "Macarena". On the local theatre scene, Salvage Vanguard Theater is winding up its second season at the Electric Lounge, where it has hooked up with its under-30 target audience and hooked them on plays. But despite that success, SVT artists are "looking to break out of the bars and spread to new nontraditional stages." So says Ray Colgan, the man everyJason Neulander: "Those of us who were there at the beginning of SVT shared both a punk rock ethos - raw emotion, do-it-yourself, jagged edges - and a love for Star Wars and Raiders. So the common ground for the punk rock theatre thing and the radio adventure thing was a product of the time we grew up; punk rock and Star Wars were simultaneous phenomena for us impressionable kids."

Which may explain why Neulander liked the idea. He suggested that the piece be penned sitcom-style, with a team of writers mapping out the major arcs of the story and individual writers scripting specific episodes. "I came up with the characters," says Colgan, "and we came up with a plot arc with all the best things of serials: Nazis, fast-talking reporters, hypnotism, and aliens. The fun was going to be seeing how the different writers got us from point A to point B. Jason picked the writers, who came from different backgrounds."

The writing team was made up of Colgan, playwrights Lisa D'Amour (16 Spells to Charm the Beast) and Julia Edwards (Scavengers), and Jessica Reisman, who was in graduate school on a fiction fellowship. For Reisman, the draw was "an opportunity to do a different kind of writing and to work with other writers on something that sounded like a lot of fun, with elements that appealed to me. I've always read and written science fiction. The weekly installment structure gave a nice sense of excitement and urgency to the whole thing, too."

"Urgency" may be an understatement, given the schedule for the first Nemesis. The breathless, turn-on-a-Mercury-dime saga - librarian from the future Ben Wilcott drafts ace reporter Molly Sloan and sidekick Timmy Mendez to help him thwart evil extraterrestrials from conquering Earth – was mapped out




sound effects for a 7pm curtain. It's astounding that the show came together at all."

Chad Nichols, an actor in the first Nemesis and a writer on the sequels, remembers it as "a dizzying pace, especially for theatre. But it allowed you to be very loose and intuitive. It was great as an actor because you couldn't fixate on things; you just kind of had to go for the gusto. Buzz and Tony had the most interesting job, coming up with the sound effects. Every week the script posed a kind of logistical puzzle for them, and their solutions could be incredibly creative. Rehearsals were like our own

He learned quickly that sound wasn't just a casual element of the show. "The writers were all really excited to have sound effects, so they added as many as they could possibly think of in every episode," Moran says. "We would be given the scripts for the week's episodes the day before the show, and that was all the time we had to find and practice using all the things asked for in the script. Imagine having one day to find out the sound of a 'mind whammy,' a 'robot army,

just trying to get plays on the tiny stagelike area in a Congress Avenue coffee shop. "The term 'Little Theatre in Little City' had popped into my head. Somehow that morphed into a radio serial."

A science-fiction radio serial, let's not forget. For SVT, whose work up to then had been all rock & roll and ragged edges, wasn't the pressed pants and pocket-protector geekiness of sci-fi a little out of character? Not according to company co-founder and Artistic Director

over 10 15-minute episodes, but the episodes weren't

finished before the production launched. In fact, the Nemesis scribes were writing on the fly throughout the five weeks of the first run. Two episodes were presented each Sunday, which meant that two of the writers had to crank out an episode each between Monday and Friday.

"We'd get scripts on Friday," says Neulander, "rehearse with the cast for a couple of hours on Saturday, talk about how the heck we were going to create the sound effects after that, run the sound effects at 4pm on Sunday, then race to Little City to set up the sound system and You know, 'Pass me

that pickle bucket and a plunger."

Tony was Tony Nozero, a drummer who was asked to provide the show's live sound effects, and Buzz was Buzz Moran, who was asked by Nozero to help. "I had always played around with getting sounds from nonmusical objects. I was a big fan of radio shows and science fiction," says Moran. "When I found out that the show would take a ton of time and pay nothing, I was hooked."



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cab in transit, a jail-cell door slamming shut. There was a lot of adrenaline flowing during that time."

"My most vivid memories of the project were rehearsals, which were at Tony and Buzz's house," says Julia Edwards. "We packed a cast of actors, a few writers, lots of gadgets, and the sound guys into a tiny living room, and there was no air conditioning. So I remember lots of creativity, invention, humor, and sweat. Which I think sums up art in Austin pretty well."

The trick, though, is finding an audience in Austin for all that humor, invention, and creativity. Many a local production has struggled to draw just a handful of theatregoers, and one might have expected an experiment in retro sci-fi performed on Sunday nights in a coffee shop to have done so. But somehow that was not the case. "The first week, we could not fit everyone who wanted to see it into the space," says Neulander, who was floored. "I'm not sure if we even sent out a postcard; the only way to find out about it was word of mouth."

Moran was amazed not only by the size of the crowd but also by how "rowdy and appreciative" they were. "It might have helped that the show was free, but nobody was telling them to scream and applaud so loudly. Actually, we did tell them to scream and applaud loudly, but they certainly didn't have to oblige us."

About the only thing more surprising than all the people who packed Little City for *The Intergalactic Nemesis*' first night was all the people who kept packing it week after week. "I didn't think that many people would come out for it, but people came," says Colgan, "and kept coming, even though the episodes were too long, horribly paced, didn't make much sense, and were in no way even close to being done as smoothly as they are now. Our beloved Foley artists were teaching themselves Foley art week to week. It was very, very amateur, but people still seemed to enjoy it."

For Neulander, it didn't take much of seeing that enjoyment to know they'd caught lightning in a Klein Bottle. "After that first week, I realized we had stumbled onto something," he says. "I told Ray that we needed to play the Paramount – that even if it took 10 years, we needed to stick with this because we had tapped into something big."

Though that performance at the Paramount actually took 12 years to happen, Neulander was right about the show. *The Intergalactic Nemesis* continued to find success. The Little City performances, which had been recorded, made the leap to radio, getting a run in true production for New York, a new website, and a graphic novel with Austin comic artist Tim Doyle. "*Nemesis* has grown to a scale that I wouldn't really have dreamed of when we created it," says Neulander. "Touring to 25 cities and towns, playing venues from 400 to 2,200 seats. It's unbelievable to me."

And how does one explain all this success? Does it have anything to do with science fiction? Ray Colgan isn't convinced. "The writing was so quick and unplanned; you were given last week's script and told what needed to happen by the end of yours, and you just busted it out. Since that somehow connected with people, it seems like any genre would have worked as long as you were willing to throw every absurd thing you could into the mix and play with every cliché of that genre."

Julia Edwards is inclined to agree: "I'm a big sci-fi geek, but I think the project would have succeeded if it was adventure or mystery. There's so little sci-fi in theatre, though – and perhaps the reason the radio idea worked so well was we could tap into the collective imaginations of the audience members to fill in the intergalactic pictures. I think the true attraction was watching the Foley artists smash, whirl, and clang whatever was in sight."

That's an idea that resonates with Chad Nichols: "The overarching thing that has always kept people interested in this show is the Foley. By having the Foley artists vis-

serial form on KUT's Soundsight program in 1997. Three years later, Moran approached Neulander about condensing the serial into an evening-length piece of theatre. ("My thought was that I could finally get paid for my work on the show," he says. "We put it back together and performed it at the State Theatre for an excited, sold-out audience, and I still didn't get paid.") The success at the State prompted Neulander and Colgan to develop the first sequel, Return of the Intergalactic Nemesis, the next year. That led to a production of the original and the sequel in repertory in 2002 and to the idea of taking the show on the road. A possible tour that summer fell through, but at a conference on touring theatre in 2004, Neulander met Christine Tschida of the national arts management firm Rena Shagan Associates - "She had been the producer of A Prairie Home Companion and completely 'got it,'" he says - which led to The Intergalactic Nemesis getting booked around the country. In 2006, a year after the second sequel, Intergalactic Nemesis: Twin Infinity, was produced, Salvage launched its first national tour with a performance in the 1,200-seat Hogg Auditorium on the University of Texas campus. Nemesis continues to get bookings, and now that he has stepped down as Salvage Vanguard artistic director, Neulander is putting extra energy into the show, working on a commercial

ible, the audience has this constant sense of discovery: 'Oh, that's how that's done. How inventive.' Conceptually, what the sci-fi angle did was open up possibilities. Once the characters were in space, the writers could do just about whatever they wanted. And so could the Foley artists. When they weren't anchored to familiar sounds, they could have a lot more latitude in designing the different effects. That's when the show started to feel like a real sci-fi serial."

Jessica Reisman, though, sees the retro sci-fi in *Nemesis* as being compatible with both the larger audience and the format: "That kind of science fiction – gosh-wow, anything-ispossible, hand-waving, fun gizmo [sci-fi] – is very appealing to both kids and a lot of adults who are still mourning the lost future they were promised by early [sci-fi] – flying cars, rocket packs, and [faster than light] – and aren't so engaged by the future we're living, which is more about information technology and biology. Also, I think space-adventure [scifi] might just be a better fit with the medium of the radio play and the historical context it harkens back to."

Buzz Moran agrees that history figures in, but he believes that The Intergalactic Nemesis wouldn't have gone as far as it has without the imaginative thrust of its chosen genre. "There is something about science fiction that sets it apart from regular monster or adventure stories. There is the possibility that anything can happen, that even accepted science needn't be followed," he says. "But when making something that is an homage to science fiction of the distant past, that explanation gets a little strange. There is something enticing about the way the future was viewed in the past. I can't get enough of the look of robots from the 1950s and earlier, but I hate the look of modern robots. I'll take Robbie over a Transformer any day, and I think it's a love of the archaic, outdated design of yesterday's cutting-edge technology. The Intergalactic Nemesis fits well into that idea: an antiquated entertainment form, the radio drama, about a future that you completely picture in your mind, although you are coerced to picture that future through vintage glasses. My kind of contradiction."

Besides, he notes, SVT did try another kind of genre radio drama, a slightly supernatural, hard-boiled detective story called *Song of Evil.* "The audiences were there, but it just never took off," he says. "It was missing the lure of outer space."



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
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
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The Future's So Dark I Gotta Wear Mirror-Shades Cyberpunk

"The future masters of technology will have to be lighthearted and intelligent. The machine easily masters the grim and the dumb."

– Marshall McLuhan

With apologies to Charles Dickens and Marley's money-boxed ghost, cyberpunk is dead to begin with. There is no doubt whatsoever about that. Old cyberpunk is as dead as Marley's doornail or Apple's Mac OS 9 or the mission-to-Mars space program so grandly announced, and so recently, too. You want to go to Mars, space-boy? Go read Ray Bradbury. Cyberpunk – literary, filmic, etc. – isn't going to get you there any more than Richard Branson is a virgin.

Initially a literary movement defined by a wittily jaundiced view of emergent computer technology and human interaction therewith and chronicling a steady stream of fringedwelling, tech-savvy human protagonists who engage in skirmishes with the Machine as well as one another, cyberpunk (the term is credited to sci-fi author Bruce Bethke) went viral almost immediately, alongside its meatier offshoot, splatterpunk. It moved beyond the printed page to encapsulate and define a grim, edge-dancing, occasionally technophonic world-view that in hindsight looks positively prescient.


For a while, roughly from the mid-Eighties to the late Nineties, cyberpunk's fashionable nihilism – black leather, mirror-shades, smart bars, *Wired* magazine – managed a rare balancing act by becoming de rigueur among the literary, cinematic, and style-conscious cognoscenti while remaining totally, mysteriously underground in less pessimistically enlightened areas. Just like its symbolic forebears the Sex Pistols and the Situationists before them, cyberpunk never quite played in Peoria.

Like all great literary and cultural movements – edgy, forward-thinking, smart, and mean – cyberpunk died a thousand deaths, not least of which was the arrival in theatres, in

1995, of Robert Longo's film adaptation of William Gibson's Johnny Mnemonic. Any genre codified in the flesh by Keanu Reeves - no matter how good the story - is doomed or, at the very least, clumsily embodied to the point of ridiculousness. You could, of course, make the argument that Reeves, who went on to play two of the most nuanced and socially relevant cyberpunk roles – Neo in The Matrix series and Bob Arctor in Richard Linklater's recent buzz-kill A Scanner Darkly - helped keep the genre alive in the minds of the Great Unwashed far longer than it would have lingered otherwise. But the final, single-tone, flat-line truth of the matter is that you simply don't hear cyberpunkthe-term being bandied about all that much anymore.

The rattle and hum and wiry thrum that you hear whisperstreaming behind the everyday

white noise of human behavior is the sound of reality: omnivorous and insidious and insatiable (I like to visualize it as looking kind of like Stephen King's goofy, world-devouring Langoliers), bumping up against the futuristic fictions of cyberpunk and osmotically absorbing them whole, amoebalike, a vacillating bacillus of bad, black, 24/7 broadcast news from the front lines of the end of time. Cyberpunk's grave new worlds have become today's geopolitical and cultural battle-space. Cyberpunk's dystopian future is now, everywhere and neverwhere and all points in between. If you've been in any major metropolitan area in the past decade, you'd be hard-pressed not to notice that Ridley Scott's Blade Runner, with its polyglot culture crush and conspiratorial, noirish unknowability, is no longer a fiction.



The great cities of the world - New York, Los Angeles, Beijing, Mumbai, and even the real-world Tokyo of the watershed animé Akira - have mutated and metastasized in a frenzied, corporate-controlled, dystopian freak-out that's plenty fun to visit, but you wouldn't want to live there. But, of course, you do. Cyberpunkery across all disciplines has become less an easy, buzz-worthy metaphor for a viciously Homeland Security-monitored, TALON'd-and-terrifying futuristic nightmare than a convenient tech-lit label rendered obsolete in the face of a sprawling, fiber-optimized, and perpetually exploding neo-Tokyo that's running roughshod over the off-line unluckies of the Third World. Ever the steadfast, Intelchipped tin insurgents marching resolutely into the gaping maw of an unknowable future,

cyberpunk's leading literary overlords (William Gibson, Neal Stephenson, John Shirley, the late Philip K. Dick, and Austin's own roaming futurist/seer Bruce Sterling) continue to amaze and horrify with their tech-static/tech-phobic visions of a wholly globalized worldwide weird.

As cultural soothsayers, the cyberpunk auteurs still have their trademark long teeth and sinewy, loping legs, but the black fact of the matter is that the futurist fictioneering of Gibson's "The Gernsback Continuum" and Sterling's *Zeitgeist* has not only been superseded by the sort of reality mind-bombs not seen since the steampunk days of the Industrial Revolution.

Simply surfing the Usenet news posts and horny little chan-boards confirms and extrapolates the famous dictum "information wants to be free," and most anyone with a working

Favorite sci-fi book: Everybody should read the young-adult novel *Feed* by M.T. Anderson. Like the best science fiction, it is speculative but

plausible and essentially truthful. It's not anti-technology, but it critiques how advertising and social media collide to dumb us down.

Most underrated sci-fi film:

People seem to hate *Cherry 2000*, probably because it's cheap and goofy, and the putatively kickass postapocalyptic heroine is Melanie Griffith. But there's so much more to this story of an Orange County scumbag who short-circuits his sexbot and travels through a desert wasteland – "the Zone" – to replace her, such as Tim Thomerson as the fascistic health-nut bad guy, Lester. The satire of sexual politics is surprisingly trenchant, and I'm always glad to hear Harry Carey Jr. say, "You can go take a shit in your hat."

Most overrated:

At the risk of being a traitor to my generation, I've just never found the *Star Wars* movies very interesting on a subtextual level. And we had the *Star Wars* that was good.

The one that made you leave the night-light on as a kid:

When The Day After aired on ABC

in 1983, our entire fifth-grade class stopped sleeping.

Sci-fi futuristic landscape you most wished you lived in and why:

I'd like to add the shopping scenes from *Night of the Comet* and a bartending El-Aurian Whoopi Goldberg from *Star Trek: The Next Generation* to Marge Piercy's novel *Woman on the Edge of Time*.

Favorite sci-fi gadgetry:

The socially responsible answer would be the Mr. Fusion Home Energy Reactor from *Back to the Future Part II*, but my honest answer is the Orgasmatron from *Sleeper*. Hell, we need them both.

knowledge of the Net knows that life online is often if not always more hypnotic and enthralling than anything the mundane world has offered since the Power Macintosh G3.

Those who've peeped Shinya Tsukamoto's tech-fetishistic Tetsuo or Cronenberg's Game Boy hell eXistenZ know that technology first panders to our most base desires. Fritz Lang knew it when he designed Maria, the sexiest virtual robo-babe this side of Seven of Nine, for 1927's Metropolis, and certainly the National Security Agency spooks and DARPAnet data-miners are well aware of the Net's cyber-disseminating powers. Jihad and porn make for strange bedfellows - well, not that strange when you include the 72 post-corporeal virgins scenario - but the mind- and libido-boggling popularity of their dominance over the darker corners of the Web is nothing if not a case of reality as Zemeckisized castaway, beached upon the infinite nanobot sands of those islands in the Net.

So what is cyberpunk when the whole wide world, webbed and phreaky, is suddenly looking like something out of a Roland Emmerich/ Michael Bay production? It's useful as a tool, a yardstick to measure the weirdness, but even at their best, the amphetamine reptile musings of Philip K. Dick seem way too plausible – almost passé – when compared to al Jazeera's global reach and our side's unmanned Hunter drones. It's the sort of bad craziness you wish Hunter S. Thompson had been able to stick around for.

Instead we got *Transmetropolitan*'s Spider Jerusalem, renegade gonzo journalist-cumcomic-book antihero, oozing sarcastic cynicism while trying to keep his shit together in a 2000AD kind of world. Which looks suspiciously like our own:

"Journalism is just a gun. It's only got one bullet in it, but if you aim right, that's all you need. Aim it right and you can blow a kneecap off the world."

Warren Ellis' Jerusalem, just like the real one, thrives on chaos and a squirrelly sort of laptop nomadism. He wore cheaters, too, a nice gonzo touch that Thompson would've appreciated. But they're both either MIA or KIA these days, and the difference engine has been retrofitted to run on steampunk as we await the crashing of the grid, already under way.

Cyberpunk? That was now, but this is then. The artificial kid has become the demolished man.

Science Fiction Gets the Vapors Steampunk

"We're living in science fiction," people like to say.

They wave a hand at the array of laptop computers crowding shaky tables in a downtown coffeehouse; they nod toward a passing citizen with some telephone-ish gizmo clamped along an ear's fungiform cartilage; their fingers stroke the sides of a tomato genetically modified with the DNA of distant jellyfish; their LASIK-enhanced eyes track, in the night sky, the glimmer of a private spaceship plying its tourist trade against the vault, the vault, the vault of heaven.

"The future's already here," people like to say.

Because we've been prepared for it for so many years. Because its coming has been heralded throughout our cultures since Homo sapiens learned to bind time and gaze beyond the moment. And the times change, and with those changes have always come new visions of the future. Only now, the problem is, our vigorous science and technologies have begun to advance at such a pace that what we're creating for ourselves is close to matching the most popular predictions of our recent history.

Oh shit: We're catching up.

This makes further extrapolation more difficult, for one thing. Who can properly conjure a tomorrow that innovation might render obsolete before the light, perhaps bioluminescent, can dawn on that new day? Who can focus a sense of wonder on a realm that relentless industry has shattered into a fractal clusterfuck of shifting possibilities? Also, isn't everything going to hell around us? Aren't we headed, after all, for some final disaster – military, environmental, planetary, celestial – that our machines and ingenuity can't save us from and which makes the idea of any future highly unlikely at best? What the hell do we do with a situation like this?

We go, as the Firesign Theatre asserted in another context, forward into the past.

Deep into the past: to a simpler, more elegant time before ubiquitous electricity and the internal combustion engine warped a wider vulgarity into the tapestries of our lives. To a time before plastic, especially: Victorian, in a word. But – and here's the neat trick – in harking back (in fiction, in visual art, in fashion, and other modes of expression), we bring our favorite modern technologies with us.

Ladies and gentlemen, mesdames et messieurs, inhabitants of this brave new world – welcome to steampunk.

Gentleman-tinkerers of the late 19th century inventing clockwork-driven automatons that would put Honda's ASIMO to shame; analytical engines, the bastard brainchildren of Charles Babbage and Ada Lovelace, performing computation beyond human reckoning; the more personal bits of today's polyvinyl-chloride technology now reconfigured in

brass and wood and leather. Nothing virtual here: It's all hardware, machine



culture you can pry apart and modify

with elbow grease and scientific

know-how. And, dash it all, don't those frock coats and goggles look simply smashing!

The writer K.W. Jeter suggested the term "steampunk" back in 1987 as a label for the sort of narrative created in his 1979 novel, *Morlock Night* – a sort of twisted sequel to H.G. Wells' *The Time Machine* – and in the fiction of Tim Powers, James P. Blaylock, and others. William Gibson and Bruce Sterling's 1990 novel, *The Difference Engine*, brought the nascent subgenre to a higher resolution and a much wider audience. Alan Moore and Kevin O'Neill's comic-book series *The League of Extraordinary Gentlemen* (which debuted in 1999 and shouldn't be confused with that abomination, the later, desecrating film) gathered the creations of steampunk inspirators – the aforementioned Wells, Jules Verne, et al. – into one magnificent and vividly depicted amalgam of romance and adventure. Katsuhiro Ôtomo's 2004 featurelength animé, *Steamboy*, fueled the engines of cultural saturation with swashbuckling period details and astonishing visuals. And now here's *The New York Times*, the Old Gray Lady with the New Digital Gown, covering the burgeoning steampunk style of DIY fashion and industrial design undertaken by the fiction's more talented acolytes.

If the future's already here and what may follow it is fraught with anxiety, of course we're retreating to the past. If the present seems uncertain and tawdry when compared with some abandoned Golden Age our forebears knew, why not take our favorite toys and go – if only metaphorically, via speculative fiction or material trappings – home again?

The steampunk abode in which we'll abide won't be bedecked by the likes of Ethan Allen or Karim Rashid but by ourselves, more likely, with a little tutelage from Sean Slattery (www.steampunkworkshop.com) or Richard R. Nagy (www.datamancer.net), and it'll boast a library of books like Jay Lake's *Mainspring* and China Miéville's *Perdido Street Station* and that recent themed anthology from Ann and Jeff VanderMeer, and we'll listen, while lounging in our taffeta gowns and riveted trousers and fingerless gloves, to Rasputina and the Decemberists and Vernian Process and, oh, probably anything featuring a homemade theremin.

"The street finds its own uses for technology," as William Gibson famously put it, glossing his cyberpunk opus, *Neuromancer*. In the case of steampunk, that street's likely paved with cobblestones and lined by brasschased gas lamps, and those lamps glimmer in the dark, lighting the way toward the Temple of Exquisite Anachronism where the future is expertly retrofitted with the past, and the best of all possible times can provide a bright refuge from the worst of this world's fleeting present.

ELIZABETH FAULKNER'S DEMOLITION DESSERTS: RECIPES FROM CITIZEN CAKE



Elizabeth Faulkner, a pastry chef and restaurateur in San Francisco, has a reputation for edginess, a certain rock & roll recklessness in her artistic approach to desserts and presentations. The output certainly gets attention at her popular Citizen Cake bakery/cafe and newish restaurant venue Orson (named after another artist fond of pushing boundaries).

This compendium of Faulkner's trademark desserts is a very detailed and interesting view into the creative processes of a fine artist turned food artist. Although the title might suggest refreshments appropriate for recreational car crashes, the term "demolition" is a stand-in for deconstruction; Faulkner's method is to begin with a classic dessert (like lemon meringue pie or berry shortcake), break it down to basic elements, rethink the flavors and textures, and put it all back together in surprising and unusually eye-popping ways. An example is Karrot Keiki, a combination of bite-sized cubes of carrot cake ("caketons") surrounding a cream-cheese-and-walnut ball, garnished with pears and carrot *brunoise*, and drizzled with a sweet vinaigrette. All the basics are there, but this ain't your mama's carrot cake.

Each recipe contains detailed headnotes where Faulkner explains her inspirations and thought processes in creating the dish. I found these most interesting and evocative – once you've read some of these explanations and followed the resulting recipes, it's almost impossible not to start dreaming up a few demolitions/creations of your own.

The book is a gorgeous, coffeetable-sized visual feast, with way-larger-than-life photos of each dessert presentation. The author's animé-style alter ego, Caremi Keiki (drawn by her illustrator brother, Ryan Faulkner), scampers through the pages, spinning food fantasies and making jokes.



This is certainly not a book for novice cooks or those looking for straight-up classic desserts (although Faulkner provides a simplified, "minimalist" version of each recipe). It isn't unusual for a dish to contain three to five separate preparations, and the restaurant-style plated presentations can be intimidating. But if you're up for a culinary adventure, if you like the idea of a dessert called Waking Up in a City That Never Sleeps, *Demolition Desserts* offers a wild ride with some amazing results. – *MM Pack*

Grahm decided that was too funny not to use. Here's his

description, quoting from the back label, "Cigares, the flying variant thereof, are prohibited from landing in the protected vineyards of Châteauneuf-du-Pape by decree of that village council in 1954."

Grahm makes three versions. **Le Cigare Blanc** (\$22) is a combination of Roussanne and Grenache Blanc, which yields a wine with light mineral aromas and dense mouthfeel. Try it with fresh Pure Luck goat cheese. Rosé lovers will go for the **Vin Gris de Cigare** (\$15); fashioned to be like a wine from Provence, it's the perfect complement for grilled salmon. **Le Cigare Volant** (\$30) is styled after the famous red wine of Châteauneuf-du-Pape, with Grenache, Syrah, Mourvèdre, Carignane, and Cinsault grapes. Remember that salmonella is found in the fecal matter of humans and animals and does not occur naturally on produce, so any largescale crop contamination is the result of irrigation or washing of produce with contaminated water. The tools of molecular gastronomy

Call it what you will – techno-emotional cuisine, molecular gastronomy, culinary deconstructionism, or any of the other terms it goes by – but the new wave of cuisine that has spread around the world from Paris, Catalonia, and the Basque regions of Spain has become a force to be reckoned with. One company that has been at the forefront providing the coveted tools for this new cuisine is based in Barcelona: ICC, or International Cooking Concepts. Its founder, Marc Calabuig, worked for his father's Spanish firm, importing and distributing supplies for the confectionary trade throughout Europe.

In 1996 Calabuig had a customer in Croatia that was using far more cream than expected, especially given that it was a small country recovering from a brutal war. He decided to visit the Croatian shop to determine what was driving these phenomenal sales, only to discover the customer was also selling an Austrianmade siphon (nitrogen-charged whipped-cream dispenser) that produced a whipped-cream texture loved by the Croatian public. Since the Austrian manufacturer had no Spanish distributor, Calabuig returned home with a distribution contract for the siphons.

Customers began telling Calabuig of a chef in Roses, Spain, just north of Barcelona, who was doing amazing things with siphons. It was Ferran Adrià at the restaurant El Bulli who had been making provocative foams out of everything, from meats, seafood, sauces, and vegetables to smoke. After several months, Calabuig decided a meeting was in order, and the two got along so well that a deal was struck to produce the first recipe book of foams, a proposition that served them both. Adrià and El Bulli got publicity, while Calabuig increased siphon sales.

With the success of the book and Adrià's reputation, sales of the Austrian siphons went through the roof, so much so that Calabuig saw the potential to start his own company in 1998: International Cooking Concepts (www.cookingconcepts.com/ENG). For a while ICC sold only the siphon and the Swiss-made Pacojet *sorbetière*, but ICC was gaining a reputation among New Wave chefs as being the company that sold weird kitchen machines and tools for very specific kitchen tasks.

Avant-garde chefs began to approach Calabuig with requests for function-specific utensils and small machines with exacting specifications. The Roner was their first collaboration. Chef Joan Roca wanted a bain-marie that could hold a precise temperature because the cooking water was constantly in circulation. This allowed the chef to cook pristine ingredients at exacting low temperatures to maintain their quality.



ICC gradually developed and manufactured several new machines, each in partnership with famous chefs, industrial laboratories, and even universities. The Fakircook Grill is a small flattop griddle on stubby legs, which is lined with stainless "nails." Once heated, meat or fish is placed on top of the nails, and it cooks in seconds, from the inside out, with no loss of juices or flavor. It is then browned with a handheld torch. Another breakthrough was the




DESSERTS AT UCHI

Austin is not really a hotbed of the technologically fascinating and often expensive culinary manipulations currently known as molecular gastronomy, but that could be changing. For example, chef instructor Tim Kartiganer is adding a class entitled Molecular Gastronomy to the fall course schedule at the Culinary Academy of Austin because it is a subject that interests him. When I started searching for practitioners of the innovative food-science techniques here in Austin, all responses steered me toward Uchi pastry chef Philip Speer. Uchi restaurant is a solid financial success that has achieved both local and national acclaim. According to Speer, those things make it possible for him to experiment with new gadgets, techniques, and ingredients. "I'm lucky enough to work in a restaurant where the owners are eager to put a good portion of profits back into the business. That means the very best ingredients and equipment are available to our kitchen staff," he says with pride.

Speer's mastery of molecular gastronomy innovations allows him to enhance menus with "fried" liquids, dessert ingredients turned into stable foams or tasty powders, and fruit gelées that can become beads or spheres (rhubarb pearls, anyone?). He is also able to render all-vegetarian components thickened with natural ingredients such as agar-agar or carrageenan, rather than gelatin, an animal product. Speer's summer dessert menu offers an elaborate coffee panna cotta egg that breaks to reveal a limpid mango "yolk" hidden inside and a milk tasting comprising fried milk (frozen cubes of pastry cream dusted with puffed rice and deep fried), toasted milk (a crisp tuile made from powdered evaporated milk), ice milk (milk sherbet), and chocolate milk (softly gelled chocolate) garnished with chocolate oil. The loyal Uchi clientele can't wait to see what he'll come up with next. Speer explains it like this: "Most people come to Uchi with the attitude [that] they are going to try something new that night. I'm lucky they are willing to take that ride with me." Virginia B. 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Gastrovac, which creates an artificial oxygenfree, heated vacuum that allows items to be cooked at lower heat and creates a "sponge" effect when it is turned off so that surrounding liquids are forced back into the item.

Another example is the Clarimax, developed in collaboration with chef Ángel León and the University of Cádiz. Resembling a small espresso machine, it forces liquids of any temperature through a disposable compressed disc of algae, instantly clarifying the broth while removing all fats and much of the cholesterol. No more chilling stocks or broths to get the fat to congeal on the surface so that it can be removed or swirling endlessly in circles with a ladle to remove fat from the top of a hot stock.

Calabuig's design process involves initial input from a chef or chefs who want a machine or tool for a very specific purpose. The ICC group then brainstorms about how that goal can best be accomplished and comes up with an industrial design for the product. Mock-ups are produced, changes are made, and then the prototypes are produced and sent out to a select group of chefs all around the globe for evaluation over an extended period of time. During this time, they come up with alternate uses or modifications that could improve the product. Once changes are incorporated, the new product can be sent to be manufactured. The whole process can take as long as three years from start to finish.

ICC now makes some 25 different tools and machines for the technologically conscious chef, including the Freshlife Sprouter, a totally cool automated hydroponic sprouter for producing any kind of sprouts, and the ThermoWhip, an insulated siphon that will hold hot or cold liquids ready to foam for three hours. In their Premium Food and Beverages category, they have additives which aid spherification (a controlled jellification method to produce edible spheres or pillows from foods), emulsifiers, texturizers, and Xantana, a new thickener which doesn't dilute taste. They even produce Fever-Tree Old World tonic, bitter lemon, and ginger ale.

ICC also holds workshops where batteries of chefs are brought in from all over the world to receive training on the use of the tools and machines. Last year they brought some 2,500 chefs into their labs for demos, not counting their outreach programs abroad. There are plans in the near future to launch Hobbychef, a company to sell cooking utensils, tools, and machines to individuals, and to organize classes for both professional and amateur chefs.

The way Calabuig looks at it, this new cuisine is merely another way to produce food, and his tools and machines are no different from a high-quality chef's knife or a welldesigned chef's jacket. Molecular chefs are still seeking out the freshest and best local ingredients and are just as concerned with making food taste delicious, although there is more concern with playfulness and interaction with the diner. The big difference is in how that food is produced, and that's where ICC really shines.

Other Companies

One quality of the molecular chef is to creatively explore existing tools and machines that might have applicable uses in the kitchen. An example is Ferran Adrià's use of the cottoncandy machine to produce a multitude of different flavors of spun foods. Critics have raved about the El Bulli piña colada topped with sweet coconut silk, for example. It would be enough to make any sideshow carny proud. A casual glance through the pages of High Times magazine will reveal ads for vaporizing infusers, which were adopted from science to extract smoke-free psychoactive vapor from bits of high-end sinsemilla buds but are now also used to inject spice-scented air into dishes. Industrial food additives are being reexamined, including tapioca maltodextrin and carrageenan, modified food starches that thicken and stabilize fatty compounds, or sodium alginate, used to encapsulate foods to make spheres.

One company that has manufactured chemical laboratory heating and cooling equipment since 1963, PolyScience, is now discovering the value of the new avant-garde kitchen as lab. They have a fairly new division called Cuisine Technology (www.cuisinetechnology.com) that deals primarily with sous vide and low temperature cooking applications; their Antigriddle can take foods to 30 degrees below in seconds, for example. Their Smoking Gun is an innovative handheld smoke infuser with countless uses. Something tells me that there will be many more culinary innovations coming from PolyScience in the near future.


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MAGIC FRUIT

If you've ever wanted Tabasco to taste like doughnut glaze, stout ales to taste like chocolate milkshakes, or lemons and grapefruit to taste like candy, then your lucky day has arrived. A small berrylike fruit from Western Africa, now being grown in Florida, makes all of this taste reversal weirdness possible.

Magic fruit, also known as "miracle berry," or Synsepalum dulcificum, has been known to the Western world since 1725. The cause of the taste reaction is a protein in the fruit called miraculin, which binds with the taste buds, functioning as a sweetness taste inducer when it comes into contact with acids. The reaction is temporary, lasting from 30 minutes to an hour or more, and intensity varies between individual fruits. Miraculin works its wonders through contact with the tongue, not from ingestion, and the effects are negated by hot foods. According to the University of Florida's Center for Smell and Taste, there are no dangers connected to consumption of the fruit.

Magic fruit is a small, football-shaped red berry about an inch long, with mildly sweet pulp surrounding a bitter seed. The process is to extract the pulp and use it to coat the tongue for 30 seconds or so. Once that is accomplished, your Willy Wonka-esque experience begins. On the East Coast, a recent culinary trend has been to host "flavor tripping" parties, where a group goes together and invests in the fruit and ingredients to taste a series of acid and bitter items. Foods that are already sweet taste cloyingly sweet, and good wine tastes like MD 20/20, so stick with acidic foods for the best effects. To flavor-trip on your own, fruits can be ordered from Florida grower Curtis Mozie at www.miraclefruitman.com. A freezer pack of 30 berries costs about \$120 with overnight shipping. Another source for frozen fruits, dried pulp tablets or granules, or even seeds is www.miraclefruitusa.com/ products. John Bullington, Alamo Drafthouse chef:

Guincy Erickson, catering chef: When I was a kid growing up in Indiana, we spent part of our summer vacation on the shores of Lake Michigan, and the highlight of one of those

summer evenings was seeing a flying saucer. Everyone on the beach that night witnessed a large object fly forward and backward, first fast and then more slowly, and then it seemed to hover over the area for a while. We were never able to get any answers about what it really was.

Suzann Dvorken, private chef:

I was an opera singer in my first career. The movie *Close Encounters of the Third Kind* had a profound effect on me because I recognized the Kodály method of hand signals and musical tones the earth scientists were using to communicate with the spaceship. I realized that as a classically trained musician, I would be someone who could communicate with the aliens. I'd been working at the Alamo Drafthouse about nine months when Tim League scheduled a Rolling Roadshow screening of a sci-fi movie called *Serenity*. The screen was set up out at the location where the recent version of *The Alamo* had been shot. The space cowboys in the movie eat Chinese food, so we served pot stickers and steamed buns to a crowd that included VIPs and some of the stars of the film. That night I realized providing people a way to connect with films through food was what my job is really all about.

Virginia Wood, Food editor: I owe my career as a cook to *Star Trek.* In my early college days at UT, I was the food buyer at the Ramshorn Co-op in the West Campus neighborhood, and I also cooked dinner a couple of nights a week. After a hard day



on campus, many of my fellow residents kicked back with a bong just in time to watch daily *Star Trek* reruns in the late afternoon, tumbling down the stairs with illegal smiles and big appetites. The psychedelic enhancement made most of them very enthusiastic eaters – a great audience for someone teaching herself to cook.

Randall Grahm, president for life of Bonny Doon Vineyard:

Though I am much more a bibliophile than a cineaste, there are seminal films that overcome my resistance to motion pictures. Prior to enology, my university major was philosophy, so I am more attracted to films that address the underpinnings of existence rather than those that simply dazzle for effect. Only one thing elevates *Star Trek: First Contact* beyond the level of mere eye candy, but it is key – the Borg's statement that "Resistance is futile." I liked this concept so much that it has become Bonny Doon's mission statement.

Wes Marshall, wine writer:

I was about 6 or 7 years old when I first saw William Cameron Menzies' masterpiece, *Invaders From Mars*, which takes place in a small town where scientists are performing top-secret nuclear tests. The young protagonist, David, sees a flying saucer land in the dunes behind his house. Soon, people start disappearing and reappearing on the same dune, but when they come back out, they're zombielike and evil, with small devices planted on their necks. When his parents end up with the implants, David runs for help. But who can he trust? Ever since, when someone acts evil around me, I try to check their neck for that implant.



POP ROCKS

Back in 1956, General Foods chemist William A. Mitchell came up with the original Pop Rocks candy, a carbonated candy made from assorted sugars and flavorings, heated to the melting point, exposed to carbon dioxide at a pressure of 600 pounds per square inch, and then cooled. The cooling process traps tiny bubbles of high pressure gas in the candy, and when you dissolve them in your mouth, they tingle, sizzle, and pop.

The candy created a

huge sensation when it was finally released on the market in 1975. and from 1979 until 1983, General Foods battled rumors that consuming Pop Rocks and cola would cause kids to literally explode (witness the urban myth that Mikey of Life Cereal's "He'll Eat Anything" ad fame exploded in such a manner). General Foods gave in to

the pressure and took the candy off of the market in 1983; Kraft bought the rights in 1985 and sold the candy as Action Candy, but that was shortlived. Since 1979, Zeta Espacial S.A. of Barcelona has manufactured, sold, and exported the candy,

It was near Barcelona that Pop Rocks and food finally merged. Avant-garde deconstructionist chef Ferran Adrià of El Bulli, just up the Costa Brava, first played around with Pop Rocks, or Peta Zetas as they are known in Spain, incorporating them into some of his dishes, desserts, and cocktails. But the chef who has had perhaps the most lasting impact with Pop Rocks has been master chocolatier Oriol Balaguer of Barcelona. His Peta Zetas truffles

> are the stuff of tingly dreams: sensuous flavored chocolate bombs that subtly explode in the center. Heston Blumenthal, molecular gastronomy chef of England's three-Michelin-starred the Fat Duck has created a luscious chocolate mousse cake with a hazelnut-Pop Rocks base (recipe below).

HESTON BLUMENTHAL'S POPPING-CANDY CHOCOLATE CAKE

(borrowed from ChubbyHubby.net and converted to U.S. measurements)

For the popping-candy base

3 ounces whole hazeInuts 1.5 ounces milk chocolate 2 teaspoons mixed spice to taste (ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg, cardamom, pepper, etc.) 3.5 ounces popping candy

For the chocolate mousse 121/2 ounces dark chocolate 1¾ cups double cream Pinch of salt

For the chocolate glaze

3/4 ounce chocolate (same type as for the mousse) 1/2 cup water 8 whole coffee beans Two pinches of salt 2¹/₂ ounces cocoa powder 21/2 ounces unrefined golden caster sugar

To make the base, preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit, and roast the hazelnuts for about 10 minutes until lightly colored. Blend to a paste in a food processor, and then set aside. Melt the milk chocolate in a bainmarie (a large basin over a saucepan of simmering shallow water; take care that the water does not touch the basin), and stir in the mixed spice and popping candy. Next, fold in the hazelnut puree. Place a 6-inch ring mold on a serving dish, and gently press in the base mixture to a depth of about a half-inch. Refrigerate for at least two hours, until hard.

To make the mousse, chop the chocolate into small pieces, and place in a metal bowl. Bring ½ cup plus 1 tablespoon of the cream to a boil in a small saucepan. Pour it over the chopped chocolate, and stir extremely gently until all the chocolate has melted, watching carefully to ensure it doesn't take on a granular texture. Add the salt to taste. Once the chocolate cream has cooled to room temperature, lightly whip the remaining cream to soft peaks, but do not overwhip. Fold into the chocolate mix. Pour over the base in the ring mold, and place in the fridge to set for two hours.

To make the glaze, chop up the chocolate, and set aside. Place the water, coffee beans, and salt in a pan, whisk in the cocoa powder, then set over medium heat and simmer for about three minutes. Meanwhile, put the sugar in a small pan and melt over medium heat. Unrefined sugar will caramelize quickly, so keep an eye on it; when it does, pour over the coffee and cocoa mix, and stand back, as it will bubble and spit. Beat in the chopped chocolate and, when melted, pass through a fine sieve. When cool but still liquid, pour over the mousse to your preferred depth and return the cake to the fridge to set.

To serve, run a hot knife around the inside of the ring before removing the cake. When slicing it, again make sure the blade of the knife is nice and hot.







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


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



DVD WATCH ROBOT CHICKEN: STAR WARS

Turner Home Entertainment, \$14,98 A successful spoof needs two things: an audience that gets the joke and a spoofer with an encyclopedic knowledge of what it is he or she is ripping on. Since Star Wars has been common cultural currency for the last 30 years, it's an easy target for satirists, presuming everyone knows a stormtrooper from a tauntaun. No piece of science fiction is so ubiauitous. (Yeah, try making a Serenity parody, and see how many people get that hi-la-rious Reavers gag, fanboy.) This easy target has paid varying bounties (Clerks good, Spaceballs bad), but Adult Swim's stop-motion sketch-comedy series Robot Chicken and its half-hour Star Wars special have an advantage in the form of hyperactive actor/writer/producer/ all-around creative force/Star Wars fanboy Seth Green. He's the kid with all the coolest toys, which is handy, because the whole show is a tribute to the twisted, puerile joy of making your Ben Kenobi and

Chewbacca figures make kissyface. It's Star Wars when the camera normally turns away to follow the heroes, focusing instead on a lascivious Boba Fett and cereal-shilling Adm. Ackbar. Green has

invited all his friends to play, including Chicken regular Breckin Meyer, Star Wars alumni Mark Hamill (Luke Skywalker), Ahmed Best (Jar Jar Binks), and George Lucas (yes, that George Lucas), plus his Family Guy colleague Seth MacFarlane, who has done his own Lucas-sanctioned spoof special (also available on DVD). MacFarlane turns the planet-slaughtering Emperor Palpatine into a surly bureaucrat with a strangely misguided belief in his common touch. After Darth Vader - who Palpatine describes as smelling like "feet wrapped in leathery burnt bacon" - tells him who blew up the Death Star, he shrieks, "What the hell is an Aluminum Falcon?" There is the normal swath of DVD extras, mainly drawn from the night Adult Swim handed over its channel to Green and company to debut this special. While these sometimes degenerate into Nerf gun fights, even this free-form filler is worth plowing though for moments like the immortal yet icky Bush-bashing gem "First Daughters, Second Base." Yet the spoof is perfection, down to obsessive details of set dressing - again, the result of Green and his fellow proud nerds poring over all those making-of books every Star Wars fan collected. Robot Chicken: Star Wars is certain to keep that inner problem child happy. - Richard Whittaker

The Hard Question Why don't zombies just eat one another?

Let's face it: Zombies are assholes.

Someone had to say it. After ages of riding roughshod over us, they have never been called to account for their behavior. I, for one, would like to challenge the accepted tenets of their conduct and explore one particularly vexing question that has never been addressed.

It is generally understood that a zombie is a human corpse that has been brought back to a sort of life. The dead can be reanimated by various methods. Sometimes witchcraft is used. In other instances, zombies get their second lives from biotoxins, chemicals, or radiation gone awry, as in *Night of the Living Dead* and *I Am Legend*. In *Pet Semetary*, the dead are reactivated after being interred in an ancient burial ground. (Important takeaway from *Pet Semetary*: Don't reanimate a toddler – toddler zombies are particularly vengeful.)

Such zombie movies allude to how zombies are reanimated, but rare is the film that offers much insight into zombie life itself. Theirs is a cloistered brotherhood, and not many of their ways

are revealed to us, nor the reasons for their conduct. We can only suppose certain things. But no matter what their origins, zombies consistently exhibit the same conduct.

Zombies can no lon-

ger speak, nor do they recall their former humanness. They usually lumber about slowly and stiffly, working against the rigor mortis that had begun to set in before they were reanimated. (Surely it must be terrifying to see such a beast shambling toward you, but their sluggishness must also tax the victim's patience.) And although they may be persistent and unflappable, qualities that would serve them well in just about any job, zombies are also impervious to reason and cold to one's beseeching. They will invariably destroy your car and/or your house and/or other personal belongings. They are indifferent to personal hygiene. They search for food in groups – and we all know how annoying cliques are.

And the food zombies ruthlessly seek is human flesh. That's *you* and *me*, friend. Story upon story show zombies ripping into humans like so much potato salad at a church picnic. What's more, they help themselves to the flesh of the living *without ever asking permission*. This is where their heretofore annoying behavior crosses the line.

So the question must be asked: Why don't zombies just eat one another?



There. Someone had to say it, and I suppose I have thus unloosed the elephant in the living room. I realize this may be an unpopular proposition, but hear me out. There are many reasons why zombies simply ought to look to one another to address their nutritional needs. After all, it is

> apparent that zombies have few, if any, laws or mores governing their social interactions, so one can surmise that the cultural taboo against cannibalism does not apply.

Now, many people – living and undead alike – may argue that zombies need fresh meat. But zombies routinely demonstrate indiscriminate tastes: Witness the woman who eats the bug off the tree in *Night of the Living Dead*. Lord only knows where that bug has been. When you see some of the *live* flesh they'll eat, you can't help but wonder how their brethren could be any worse.

Some films will go one better and posit that zombies must eat brains exclusively because it eases the pain of unlife. One word: *alcohol*. Booze. Liquor. The undead might want to take a page from the playbook of the living.



Film director and zombie enthusiast Sean Abley points out, "Their whole thing is to 'rise from the dead to feast upon the living." Good for them. But wait – aren't *they* living? At least living *enough*? Living enough to meet the protein demands of lumbering, self-centered, aggressive beings that do not contribute to our American way of life a whit?

You may say zombies have certain rights. Perhaps, but with rights come responsibilities, like finding a food source that does not decimate the population. To quote my mother, "Your rights end where my nose begins."

Perhaps an even better solution would be autocannibalism. This way, they are only hurting themselves, with no awkward confrontations within zombie society after, say, Steve accidentally eats Cindy's cousin. Further, zombies will still have the opportunity to be brought back from the dead – no matter what has happened to them! This seems like a winwin scenario all around.

Regardless of the rationalizations zombie apologists may offer, there is simply no excuse. Furthermore, if such a rate of zombie carnivorousness continues, they'll exhaust the world's supply of living flesh; eventually zombies will have no choice but to eat one another. No matter what, the solution begins with them.

The Future of Funny **Has Already Happened**

Welcome to 'Spaced,' the cult British comedy with 'Star Wars' in its eyes

It's been nearly a decade in the making, but Spaced, the brilliant, hilarious, impossibly superfantastic British sitcom written by Jessica Hynes (Son of Rambow) and Simon Pegg (Shaun of the Dead) and directed by Edgar Wright (Shaun of the Dead, Hot Fuzz), is finally landing on stateside DVD, courtesy of BBC America. We'll brook no argument in saying that Spaced is the best sitcom ever made, and neither will Ouentin Tarantino. Kevin Smith, Matt Stone, Patton Oswalt, or Juno screenwriter Diablo Cody, all of whom contribute commentary tracks to the 14 half-hour episodes that compose this new, definitive triple-disc set.

But what, exactly, is Spaced? It's the ongoing story of two newfound friends, aspiring graphic novelist-cum-ravening fanboy Tim (Pegg) and would-be journalist Daisy (Hynes), who pretend to be married in order to secure an affordable flat in London. But, like all great stories, it's also about much more than its premise would lead you to believe: sci-fi and horror movies, art vs. commerce, youthful idealism, slo-mo finger-gunfights, Jaffa cakes, and friendship. Above all, though, it's a love story. One without an ending,

actually, which leaves the door open for both personal interpretation and the slim possibility of more Spaced in the future. (Just don't hold your breath.)

The Chronicle spoke with series cocreator Jessica Hynes from her home in London, in anticipation of the American DVD debut and Hvnes' upcoming July 27 appearance with co-creator Pegg and director Wright at a Spaced marathon, sponsored by Ain't It Cool News and Fantastic Fest, at the Alamo Drafthouse Ritz. Skip to the End? Don't even think about it

Austin Chronicle: The one question everybody who has seen Spaced asks is: What happened to Tim and Daisy? Or, what would have happened to Tim and Daisy had there been a third season?

Jessica Hynes: There were a few speculative conversations Simon and I had about that, and I think we kind of agreed in the end that we would like to get them together, but in a way that was as interesting as possible. We didn't want to make it too easy or use any of the usual devices that are used to keep people interested. continued on p.54





Top 5 'Star Wars' moments from 'Spaced'

Spaced is packed with pop-culture iconography, from extended homages to Manhattan, Say Anything, and The Matrix to blink-and-you-miss-it hat tips to The Shining, Evil Dead 2, Dawn of the Dead, and The Simpsons. But the most enduring reference point is Star Wars. Here are a few of the greatest hits. – Kimberley Jones

1.5: "Chaos"

Tim traces the whole cause and effect of the original *Star Wars* trilogy to the actions of a bit-part Galactic Empire gunner in the beginning of *Episode IV*. I'll let Tim explain: "If the gunner *had* shot the pod that C-3PO and R2 were in, they wouldn't have got to Tatooine; they wouldn't have met Luke; Luke wouldn't have met Ben; they wouldn't have met Han and Chewie; they wouldn't have rescued Princess Leia. None of it would have happened." What follows is a brief, heady trip into chaos theory, quickly derailed by the discovery of a pack of Jaffa Cakes in Tim's coat pocket.

2.1: "Back"

The first mention of Tim's feelings of deep betrayal at the hands of George Lucas (remember, this is 1999). A quick cut shows him swathed in Skywalker robes (à la *Return of the Jedi*) and burning in effigy his stash of childhood *Star Wars* paraphernalia. In the same episode, when Brian caves in to Agent Smith-like forces, Tim spits at him: "You Lando." *Burn*.

2.2: "Change"

Still reeling from the gut-punch suckage of *The Phantom Menace*, Tim gets sacked from his comic-book-store job for railing on a kid who tries to buy a Jar Jar Binks collectible. Choice quote: "Jar Jar Binks makes Ewoks look like Shaft."

1.5: "Chaos"

The first episode to explicitly address the issue of platonic roommates Tim and Daisy's will-they-or-won't-they relationship. We never get a definitive answer (garrrr!), but: When you plan a five-man covert op to rescue your kidnapped Scottie dog from an underground vivisection ring and you give yourself the code name "Han" and your so-called platonic roomie the code name "Princess Leia" ... well, you might be tipping your hand. We couldn't think of a sweeter, more fanboy-perfect signpost.

2.6: "Dissolution"

It's the next to last episode of the series, so it makes sense that it ends on a dark note – with boozehound landlady Marsha running off into the night, estranged from the household at large, seemingly lost to them forever. Brian and Mike head out on a mission to find Marsha while Tim and Daisy sidle up to the window and look out, shaken but newly resolved – shades of the *Star Wars* gang, post-carbonite and down but not out. Daisy walkie-talkies "good luck" to the boys, Mike yawns back in Wookiee-speak, and *The Empire Strikes Back*'s theme swells on the soundtrack. Cut to credits. Bloody spectacular.

But nothing was set in stone; nothing was written down. We never saw the show through to the natural conclusion of them growing up or becoming a couple or moving out, as in *Friends*. We never got that far. British television is different from American television in that way, you know? We do two series and then have to have a lie-down.

Ultimately, would they have got together or not? That was going to be the fun of writing it for Simon and I, because what we set up, initially, was this relationship that, as I realized afterwards, so many people can relate to, where you're in the friendship zone but there's an attraction there that's obviously more than just friendship. You almost wonder whether they would ever get to the point where they would be past their friendship and past the point of getting it on simply because they'd been friends for too long, right? But if that wasn't the case, they'd be very rare in that way because most people, if you've been friends with someone long enough, you just kind of think it would be weird to be with them in a romantic context. It would have been fun to play with that, though. AC: Edgar Wright and Simon Pegg have said that there could be more Spaced at some unspecified point in the future, whereas [co-star] Nick Frost has gone on record as saying he's sure that's not going to happen. What's your answer? Will there be more Spaced? Possibly a film, if not television? JH: I've said it, I've proposed it, and I want it. Simon doesn't, really. And I don't think Edgar can, right now. Simon feels it's not right for Spaced to return, but I would love to write those characters again and perform them again and bring them back. But Nick Frost and Simon are writing a film together; Edgar's got [comic-book adaptation] Scott Pilgrim that he's working on. They're all doing their own thing, and so logistically, to get us all back onto Spaced would be hard. And, hell, if Nick Frost is not going to do

it, then there's no show as far as I'm concerned. *AC*: How did you first meet Simon Pegg?

JH: I met Simon at an audition for a sketch show. I'd come along with my friend Katy Carmichael, who plays Twist in *Spaced*. It was her audition – I was just coming along. It was a bit of a "Leroy moment," actually. I had nothing to lose and everything to gain, and I picked up this monologue that Simon had written, which was about a guy who thought he was Peter Parker, and I did it completely differently from how Simon eventually ended up doing it. *But* I made everyone laugh, and Simon thought I was quite good, as did I when *he* had no shame at all, actually – they brought me in to replace him. Simon and I ended up writing a lot of material and scripts for that show, and as a result, the producer said Simon and I should write a show together and have Edgar direct it. Which, of course, became *Spaced*. *AC:* Was the idea for Spaced something that arrived fully formed? Or did it take a lot of backand-forth between you and Simon to develop what became these two very complex, very emotionally

honest characters? **JH:** I knew from the start that I wanted to do something that would reflect my generation

performed it. So basically we ended up hanging out, getting on, and becoming really good friends. I was only 23 at the time, so I was a bit of a tomboy to begin with. He was actually a champion of me, because I wasn't particularly driven in any sort of way in terms of comedy or whatever. I was just going with the flow. The comedy thing was happening, but I wasn't really following through, and Simon really helped to boost my confidence.

AC: And how did the idea for Spaced come about? **JH:** Simon was hooked up to do a show with Edgar called *Asylum*, which was a show about a load of comedians in an asylum. One of the comedians they had dropped out, because he thought it was unethical to make fun of mad people, and because I had no such qualms – I and my life experience, really. I left home when I was 17, started working flat-out when I was 18, and those years, from 18 to 24, were hard, but they were also magic. It was all about living in squats and having awful, shitty jobs that we hated and shared houses and no money and that entire world. And I felt that there was nothing that reflected that in a British way. Friends was just coming out over here at the time, but I remember thinking, gosh, that's so glossy, that world. Friends was almost a victim of how it was shot, practically. It didn't feel real, you know? I wanted to do something that was completely original and different and which reflected me and my friends and my generation without that sort of glossiness.

AC: One of the most memorable aspects of Spaced is its nonstop barrage of cinematic references, even to the point of Edgar shooting the episodes with a single camera. Was that always part of the template, or did that arrive later on?

JH: The parameters weren't totally fixed from the beginning, but it was Simon who honed that sort of film-reference fantasy device. And that's when it really all clicked. It was a very organic process, though, because it was all about Simon and I, as performers and writers and friends, really, very much so. And of course we were desperate for Edgar to direct it. In fact, when we first showed the scripts to him he was a bit "eh." But he came around.

AC: Did Edgar have much input into the scripts?

JH: Not really, although he did give us directorial notes along the lines of "Why don't you try it *this* way?" and "Switch *that* around."

AC: Why were there only two seasons of what was – and is – a tremendously popular show?

JH: Towards the end, I think there was feeling from Edgar that it was too hard to do what he did for the money he was getting to do it. The budget did not really reflect what was achieved, ultimately, by Edgar on a daily basis, in terms of the shooting schedule. It was all very well for Simon and I to dream up these ridiculously ambitious and fantastical stories and plot and situations, but it was Edgar who had to bear the brunt of creating all of that. Which he did, amazingly. It was so tough, and I think it was a very stressful experience directing it for television - all directing is. And by the time of the second season, Edgar and Simon had hatched the germ of the idea that would become Shaun of the Dead. I mean, we'd already had zombies in episode three of series one. Edgar and Simon were very much interested in writing something together that involved guns and zombies.

The Geeks Shall Inherit the Earth BY BELINDA ACOSTA

Ah, to be a comic-book geek with an allaccess pass to Comic-Con International 2008 (www.comic-con.org). The four-day extravaganza, to be held in San Diego this weekend, is much more than comic books and fans dressed up as their favorite superheroes. The event has mushroomed to include gaming, online culture, film, and television. In fact, there are at least 120 TV-related events at this year's Comic-Con, featuring stars, creators, and writers from existing shows such as Heroes (NBC), Lost (ABC), Terminator: The Sarah Connor Chronicles (Fox), and others. But I suspect that the more popular TV-related events will be with the stars and creators of new series:

True Blood: Vampires come out of the coffin and live in the open in Alan Ball's first TV effort since Six Feet Under (he'll serve as executive producer and show runner) (HBO).

Life on Mars: A cop gets shot in the present and wakes up in the 1970s in this U.S. clone of the BBC series (ABC).

Dollhouse: Characters have their minds imprinted with skills to undertake covert tasks; their minds Etch-A-Sketch back to blank when missions are over. Created by Joss Whedon of Buffy the Vampire Slayer (Fox).

Fringe: A cop investigating her partner's death discovers paranormal activity is overrunning the world. There will be a preview screening at Comic-Con of this highly anticipated new series from J.J. Abrams (Fox).

So what do Comic-Con and TV have in common? As TV seeks to keep existing audiences while trying to lure those who have moved to other entertainment platforms (i.e., video games and the Internet), the comic-book world is becoming a vital place to mine new material, particularly material that appeals to the current growing appetite for science fiction and fantasy. And when it comes to sci-fi and fantasy, whether it's on TV, the Internet, or on the page, the one big thing that these fans share is a loyal – some would say obsessive - devotion to their chosen story/series. And this kind of loyalty is something TV wants to cultivate. A Google search for Lost, for example, will bring up a full page (there are more) of Lost-related fan sites of various quality which exist to share information and theories about the storyline and characters and generally praise and kvetch about the series.

Fans were thrilled when Joss Whedon decided to return to TV with Dollhouse (starring Eliza Dushku of Tru Calling). The cancellation of his Western sci-fi series Firefly very publicly soured Whedon on network TV. But bygones are bygones, it seems. Dollhouse is currently set for a midseason launch on Fox, but Whedon fans can already check out his latest project, Dr. Horrible's Sing-Along Blog (www.drhorrible. **com**), which has turned into an Internet comet.

Created with his brothers Zack and Jed during the writers' strike, the three-part, 40-minute tragicomedy was specifically created for the Web but used old-time TV marketing strategies to make it "an event ... like an old TV special [where] you have to be at a certain place and a certain time to watch it," Whedon said in a Variety.com article posted July 18. (A minireview of Dr. Horrible's Sing-Along Blog appears on The Austin Chronicle's film and TV blog, Picture in Picture, at austinchronicle.com/pip.) Dr. Horrible stars Neil Patrick Harris (How I Met Your Mother) as a D-grade villain who aches to be in the big leagues. Nathan Fillion (Firefly) costars as his nemesis, the cocky Capt. Hammer, with Felicia Day as the good-hearted Penny, over whom Horrible and Hammer squabble.

Dr. Horrible was available free through July 20, and the response was so strong that it overloaded its server. It is currently available at \$1.99 per installment through iTunes (such a deal) until July 29, when it goes away forever. (Well, who believes that?) Industry watchers are waiting to see what kind of return the series has. Right now, Dr. Horrible is the top TV request on iTunes, so the prognosis is good not just for Whedon and company, who paid for the project out of their own pockets, but also for other artists to make and produce work outside the studio/network structure. But what made Whedon's project so much more successful than Quarterlife, the Marshall Herskovitz and Edward Zwick project that went belly-up almost as soon as it left the gate? The pedigrees among the creators are similar. The big differences are direction, scope, and genre. Are sci-fi, fantasy, and comic-book geeks destined to rule the TV world? If it means the obliteration of reality TV, then hey – I'm so down with it.

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

LET'S TALK ABOUT IT

What's the latest fashion craze to sweep the UK? White Denim. The local psych-pop juggernaut recently returned from a monthlong jaunt in support of the European release of its debut LP. Workout Holiday (Full Time Hobby), which comprises the group's Let's Talk About It vinvl EP plus eight new tracks. The trio recorded a few **BBC Radio** sessions and also taped an episode for producer Nigel Godrich's From the Basement series, while garnering critical praise from the likes of The Guardian, NME, and MOJO magazine. which deemed the band one of the "10 Acts You Need to Hear Right Now." "The Glastonbury Festival was definitely the



pinnacle," relays bassist **Steve Terebecki**. "There were 173,000 people there. It was its own civilization." White Denim now gears up for the release of its U.S. full-length, *Exposion*, which teams seven new tracks from *Workout Holiday* with four previously unreleased tunes.



HARDER, FASTER, STRONGER

For those that only know Jimmy Welsh and Cory Kilduff from the screaming electro-thrash of the Rise (see "The Goose & the Gander," Jan. 21, 2005), Kilduff describes the sound of their joint venture Ocelot as "what disco turned into" and, for those more versed in the realm of electronic music, "dirty house." "There's a good chance the synths are going to have some distortion on them, and the kicks are going to be really loud and heavy," Kilduff adds. "We end up playing more rock clubs than dance venues." For the past three years, Kilduff and Welsh, who now resides in Leeds, England, have constructed certified bangers and remixes piecemeal through countless iChat sessions, occasionally getting together for live shows on both sides of the Atlantic. In order to sign to the renowned Wall of Sound Records (Mogwai, Röyksopp, Soulwax), however, Kilduff has to ship out permanently to the UK. "Most of the labels over there just aren't interested in

America when it comes to dance music," says Kilduff, who bids farewell on Saturday with a solo set at the **Black & Tan Seventh Street Lounge**. "They would only work with us if we were both living over there, which has really always been the goal." Ocelot's impending debut LP, which will be released stateside through **IHeartComix**, is tentatively titled *Radio Fantasy* and features guest vocalists **Neil Hannon** of the **Divine Comedy** and the **Nation of Ulysses' Ian Svenonious**. "We've got **Clarke [Wilson**] from **Those Peabodys** reprising one of his famous lines – 'Why is the party always at my house' – over a house track," Kilduff concludes. "That's our way to nod back to Austin and what we grew up with."



BOY IN DA CORNER

"We've got a fucking legend in the building tonight," **Dizzee Rascal** of East London announced 15 minutes into his stunning set at **Emo's** on Monday. Thankfully, he wasn't referring only to himself, as **Bun B** heeded his call with a riveting rendition of "Where's da G's." For the remainder of the hour, Texas' King of the Trill seemed more than pleased to take a back seat to the unabashedly international affair, posting up against the stage-right pole and offering occasional gestures of approval while Dizzee worked the sparse crowd like an aerobics instructor with the hyper, syllabic grime of "Sirens" and current UK chart-topper "Dance Wiv Me." "I know I've got a thick accent, and you probably can't understand a word I'm sayin'," the former Mercury Prize winner prefaced "Jus' a Rascal." "But before I leave here, you're going to know my fucking name." There was no forgetting it.

BRINGING IT ALL BACK HOME

There's nothing like a chanteuse with a guitar to lure stragglers to the Lone Star State. Eclectic local songstress **Suzanna Choffel** leaves this week for a trek through the Midwest as part of **Texas on Tour**, a state-funded, mobile marketing exhibit that promotes tourism to the area through activities like virtual kayaking. "I'm really excited to just get



out on the road and expose my music to people that probably wouldn't hear it otherwise," says Choffel of the campaign, which is distributing 100,000 copies of a tour sampler that features **Trish Murphy** and **Will Sexton**, among others. "I'm looking forward to eating a lot of funnel cake and corn dogs, too."

RANDOM PLAY

Catch **Dan Dyer** live while you still can (Saturday and Tuesday at the **Continental Club**, Wednesday at **Momo's**). The local soul-man, whose self-titled new album lands outside of city limits on Aug. 26, is now being booked nationally by industry heavyweights **ICM**.

South Austin is losing two eccentric music hubs with last week's closure of Austin **Enchanted Forest**, due to a lack of various permits and sound violations (see "Naked City," p.13), and the August closing of South First's nonprofit gallery the **Opera House**. More on the former next week.

Banging hip-hop from worlds away

"The present wheel-shaped plane known as the Mother of Planes, is one-half mile of a half mile and is the largest mechanical man-made object in the sky. It is a small human planet made for the purpose of destroying the present world of the enemies of Allah."

-Elijah Muhammad, Message to the Blackman in America

Sun Ra didn't hold ties to the Nation of Islam. The jazz bandleader never claimed Islam membership or prayed to Allah. He avoided outright political controversy, a method Muhammad practiced religiously. Likely, Ra paid no mind to the teachings of Elijah Muhammad; he was

already 50 in 1965 when Muhammad's Message was published. More likely is that Muhammad was a student of the Alabama-born pianist, who was the first to hint at an extraterrestrial origin for the black race.

1952 was the year that Herman "Sonny["] Blount denounced his birth name and emerged Le Sony'r Ra, a name that soon molded into Sun Ra. The spiritual awakening that led to his name change also kick-

started the Arkestra, Ra's ever-experimenting jazz collective also known as the Solar Myth Arkestra and His Cosmo Discipline Arkestra. He declared his 1914 Birmingham, Ala., birth a myth, proclaiming himself a native of Saturn, thus connecting percussion and stringed instruments to the cosmos for the first time since Gustav Holst wrote The Planets in 1894.

Intergalactic Projection Screens

By the 1970s, blaxploitation films had begun traveling to the far reaches of our galaxy. Statements of a counter-segregation, these depicted the black culture as an independent one. They promoted and idealized a departure from the politically, culturally, and socially white world. Again, Ra lit the cosmic fuse. 1974's Space Is the Place plots the Arkestra lost after a 1969 tour, only to arrive and settle on an unknown planet. Content with the new digs, Ra sets out to bring all the still Earth-dwelling African-Americans to space, his vehicle being music.

A decade later, John Sayles' The Brother From Another Planet dropped a three-toed African-American mute in the middle of Harlem. Played by Joe Morton, the brother was chased through New York by two white agents trying to return him to his native planet.

While Space's soundtrack relies heavily on Arkestra songs, many blaxploitation films, The Brother From Another Planet included. were platforms for soul and funk music back on Planet Earth. 1971's Sweet Sweetback's Baadassss Song launched Earth, Wind & Fire;

the infamous Isaac Haves stepped into the limelight after Shaft. Once dominated by Ra's jazz, the soundtrack for the new black world had developed a mean backbeat.

'We Have Returned to Claim the Pyramids'

The opening lines from Parliament's "Mothership Connection" didn't bother hiding the group's interstellar fixation. George Clinton's brainchild elevated funk to inconceivable levels of popularity and further encouraged its cosmic relativity in the 1970s. Mothership Connection, 1975, rode in on an absolute party, making

outer space one happenin' place. In a 2006 interview with Cleveland Scene, Clinton explained, "I was a big fan of Star Trek, so we did a thing with a pimp sitting in a spaceship shaped like a Cadillac, and we did all these James Brown-type grooves, but with street talk and ghetto slang."

It would become one of the defining albums in the development of hip-hop.

By the early 1980s, Bronx hip-hop culture was in full swing, spinning DJ Kool Herc, Grandmaster Flash & the Furious

Five, Grand Wizard Theodore, and a grandiose community leader named Afrika Bambaataa. They'd pull their breaks off funk records, from James Brown drumbeats, and from Isley Brothers hooks. Bambaataa took noted interest in Clinton's work. Emerging as Afrika Bambaataa & Soulsonic

Force, Bam dropped 1986's Planet Rock, a nod to Clinton's Afrocentric festival. The album led the public to dub Bambaataa "The Father of the Electro-Funk Sound."

SUN RA AND HIS INTERGALACTIC SOLAR ARKESTRA

Soundtrack to the Film Space Is the Place (Evidence) Part music documentary, part science-fiction adventure, part blaxploita tion epic, this obscure 1974 film finds keyboardist/bandleader Sun Ra and his Arkestra arriving from outer space in a rocket ship to the ghetto in Oakland, Calif., to battle the evil overseer for the souls of black people. Along the way, the viewer's treated to this expansive soundtrack of otherworldly delights that could have easily appeared in any number of 1950s

sci-fi flicks. The opening chants of "It's after the end of the world," Ra's eerie use of electronic keyboards, and the distant skronking of the Arkestra's horns are every bit an interstellar soundscape as they are jet-propelled free jazz explorations. Sun Ra always claimed to be from Saturn, and with celestial band classics like "Calling Planet Earth," "Satellites Are Spinning," "We Travel the Spaceways," and the signature title track, he and the Arkestra masterfully channel the cosmos through their visionary interpretation of the jazz tradition. ****

Clinton's interstellar party may not have touched down with Public Enemy, but its outof-this-world resonance shook down to the turn of the century, when, in 1995, the fascination reached a renaissance. Cali's alternative hip-hop movement, a response to Dr. Dre's G-Funk by Delicious Vinyl heads Souls of Mischief, Dilated Peoples, and Hieroglyphics, took off upon the Pharcyde's release of LabCabinCalifornia. The Jay Dee-produced album cued a departure from the chaos surrounding the Bad Boy/Death Row rivalry. Hip-hoppers across the country took note.

Sending oneself into orbit was option B to the more popular and controversial gangsta rap. Outkast dropped 1996's ATLiens, music's most obvious attempt at interstellar funk since Clinton himself. The Roots built on Sun Ra's jazz stylings with Illadelph Halflife that same year. De la Soul dressed the part for AOI: Bionix (2001), while Del the Funky Homosapien joined DJs Dan the Automator and Kid Koala and jumped into the future for Deltron 3030's self-titled album, released 1,030 years in its own past.

The trend continues today, on Planet Earth and beyond. Lil Wayne's Tha Carter III rolls "Phone Home," Wayne playing the role of E.T.: "We are not the same, I am a martian." His mixtape classic, "I Feel Like Dying," speaks of "sittin' on the clouds" and mingling with the stars while throwing a party on Mars. The oh-so-down-to-earth Kanye West first touched off with 2004's "Spaceship," and his current Glow in the Dark Tour pits him as an interstellar explorer whose spaceship crashes on an unknown planet. Reports from Houston suggest the wreck interrupted the Arkestra's set.

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
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The Day the Earth Stood Still

Sci-fi soundtracking to the beat of Leon Theremin, Bernard Herrmann, Bob Moog, Wendy Carlos, and John Williams

Science-fiction soundtracks are a special breed, disproportionately represented in lists of the most memorable and inventive film scores of all time. I've been listening to them since I was 6 years old, when my uncle took my brother, my cousin, and me to see *Star Wars*. As I've grown older, some reasons for their appeal have become apparent to me, while some are still a mystery. For the composer and director, a science-fiction score presents specific challenges, and throughout the decades, many solutions have been tried, some to great success, others to abject failure.

Music of the Future

Evolving at a dizzying pace, technology dominated the last century. Musical instruments have kept pace, first in the electronic realm, then in the digital. More than any other film genre, science fiction embraces new instruments, solving a primary problem: how to make music for an unknown time

and place. In 1951, Bernard Herrmann, film's greatest composer, scored *The Day the Earth Stood Still*. The music featured two theremins (see "'Theremin: An Electronic

Odyssey," below), the first widespread electronic instrument, and to this day, its sound conjures images of robots, spaceships, and aliens. For *Forbidden Planet*, the husband-and-wife team of Louis and Bebe Barron created the first all-electronic score for a mainstream film. In 1956, the synthesizer as we know it today hadn't yet been invented, and most electronic music was in the hands of a few obscure composers. The Barrons' bleeps, bloops, and whirs were assembled into a fantastic score with recognizable, if unconventional, themes in a sound world like no other before it.

The trend continued; think of Wendy Carlos' Moog synthesizer in *A Clockwork Orange* (see "Moog: A Revolution in Sound," p.61) or Vangelis' embrace of the digital synthesizer in *Blade Runner*. However, for all the great scores this approach produced, it also created a key problem. Like most technology, these scores dated themselves in the blink of a droog's eyeball, going from strange and mysterious music of the future to outdated music of the past.

Music of the Past

To avoid the carbon-dating pitfall, some of the most famous sci-fi sound-

tracks approached the challenge from the flip side. In making music of the future, they turned to a

timeless style using instruments that have been around for hundreds of years: classical music and the symphony orchestra. In *Star Wars* and *2001: A Space Odyssey*, this alternative approach yielded two of the most successful sci-fi soundtracks ever, both artistically and financially.

People know they're supposed to like classical music, but, well, mostly they don't. It's long; it's bor-

ing; it's old. For new orchestral music, the verdict's even more grim. It took Stanley Kubrick, then, to prove that given the right context, classical music and orchestral avant-garde could enter the mainstream. The director rejected the original score composed and recorded for 2001 and in its place used a combination of Johann and Richard Strauss (no relation) and 20th century Romanian radical György Ligeti. The power of *Also Sprach Zarathustra*, the nostalgia of *The Blue Danube*, and the otherworldly but organic Ligeti music was incredibly effective in making the slow-paced abstract film engaging and emotional. The soundtrack album broke sales records and remains in print to this day.

GRAHAM REYNOLDS IS NOT OF THIS EARTH

"The immediate problem when you approach the scoring of a science-fiction film is that it's set in the future or on an alien world or whatever the story demands of you musically," explains Austin composer Graham Reynolds.



Reynolds, who, amidst a seemingly infinite

number of musical projects with Golden Arm Trio and its myriad offshoots, composed the score for Richard Linklater's ani-daptation of Philip K. Dick's A *Scanner Darkly* and knows whereof he speaks. In addition to A *Scanner Darkly*, Reynolds has composed future-fluent sound for Austinite Justin Hennard's moody *Moonlight by the Sea*, Fritz Lang's *Metropolis*, the infamous *Turkish Star Wars* (with Buzz Moran's Foleyvision), and 1970s disco hack Meco's favorite: a series of all *Star Wars* covers shows.

"The problem with scoring sci-fi," notes Reynolds, "is that even the newest technology is not the music of the future for very long at all. With *Scanner*, the first approach we talked about was an all-acoustic route. But with the drug element so integral to the film and with the disconnect between the drug storyline and an acoustic score, it just didn't work.

"Our ultimate solution, and one which echoes the fact that the film was first shot on video, was to use acoustic instruments and then transform them with digital effects. It was organically heightened. The movie is set seven years in the future, so I guess we still have a couple more years until we find out how dated the score is." - Marc. Savlov



'THEREMIN: AN ELECTRONIC ODYSSEY'

In 1994, after finishing a show at Lounge Ax in Chicago, I was taken by a friend to another club to check out Pere Ubu. As striking an experience as a Pere Ubu show can be, I was captivated by a guy standing toward the back of the stage motioning his hands in the air while not holding a readily apparent instrument. He made the most amazing sounds I had ever heard. I asked my friend what on earth was he playing, and she said, "Oh, that's a theremin." I was familiar with the name from

Jimmy Page and the Beach Boys, but I had never seen or heard one in person. As cool as it sounds on albums, it's a whole different story live. I knew I had to have one. After a year of searching, I came across a company called Big Briar, run by Bob Moog, that sold a basic theremin kit called the Etherwave. One hundred and twentyfive dollars later, I was a proud owner.

Invented in 1919 by Russian physicist Lev Sergeevich Termen (Léon Thérémin) though not patented until 1928, the theremin is the only instrument that's played without being touched. With your hands acting as grounded plates, sound is created through their proximity to two antennas, one controlling pitch, the other volume. Essentially, it's like playing slide guitar on one very long string, without any frets or reference points. You tune it to your body, which is easier said than done. A theremin player is literally pulling a melody out of very thin and unforgiving air.

I won't bother with a brief history of the instrument, as it wouldn't do it justice. Instead, I direct the curious to the fascinating 1994 documentary *Theremin: An Electronic Odyssey*. Used in countless science-fiction film scores, the theremin also appears on more recordings these days than it should. My suggestion is to get on YouTube and type in Pamelia Kurstin, who's worked with Austin's Pat Mastelotto. Locally, check out thereminist Yvonne Lambert in the Octopus Project, or track down the Austin Theremin Orchestra.

l've never known a particular instrument to inspire such curiosity and excitement. Vladimir Lenin became a student after hearing it, and then there's a certain promoter in Hoboken, N.J., that stuck around after a performance by my band, the Friends of Dean Martinez, to play mine, before skipping off with all the money from the door. Hopefully, he used some of it to buy a theremin of his own. – Bill Elm

Science fiction embraces new instruments, solving a primary problem: how to make music for an unknown time and place.


For *Star Wars*, John Williams also turned to the orchestra for its timeless quality, but instead of the direct familiarity of Kubrick's classics, he constructed an exceptional new score using references, ideas, and sometimes brazenly stolen sections of classical music, from Stravinsky to Ravel to Holst. Only in the cantina scene did the composer use modern electronic instruments. The score became so popular that ever since, struggling symphony orchestras have used concerts of Williams' *Star Wars* music to reach out to new audiences. It's dramatic and exciting, lushly beautiful, the pieces roughly equivalent in length to the popular music of today.

Heightened Music and Heightened Hearing

People hear science-fiction soundtracks. In other genres, the viewer is often unaware of the presence of music and its relation to his or her understanding of the film. Walking down a city street or any other familiar place, most people filter out any sound information not pertinent to their mission. When traveling to a strange place, however, ears become wide open. In these less familiar places, people absorb and observe their new environment. Well, nothing is newer than an alien planet or a spaceship or a creature unlike anything on Earth.

As a result, sci-fi movies have that same ears-wide-open effect, times 10. The result is that, with the smallest amount of sound, we recognize a melody on a theremin or the communicator from *Star Trek* or the notes of a Moog synthesizer or the electro bleets of R2D2. For most composers and musicians, there's no more coveted goal than being listened to, and science fiction leads to that more than any other type of music used in film.

The heightened nature of the elements, from characters and setting to the battles and aliens, also allows the music to be heightened. In so many film scores, there's an ideal that the best score is unheard and works its magic subtly, almost secretly guiding the audience's emotions and understanding of a scene. Science-fiction music may be well-crafted, intricate, and sophisticated, but more often than not, it doesn't have to worry about invisibly nestling into the background. It can come out loud and proud and do its work creating new and exciting musical worlds that live on in our collective consciousness.

THE ROCKY HORROR PICTURE SHOW

The appeal of this 1975 low-budget, low-rent, sci-fi musical about a bawdy transsexual from another planet (Tim Curry) who builds his own Frankenstein, seduces both members of a white-bread couple (Susan Sarandon and Barry Bostwick), and kills schlock-balladeer Meat Loaf in barely more than 90 minutes eludes me. That it hasn't been pulled from theatres in more than 30 years and still inspires lunatics around the world to waste their Saturday nights dressing up in costume and re-enacting speaks for itself, as does its soundtrack. ★★

THE MAN WHO FELL TO EARTH

David Bowie had retired his androgynous alien persona, Ziggy Stardust, by the time director Nicolas Roeg asked him to star in this 1976 adaptation of Walter Tevis' sci-fi novel, but with his chiseled cheekbones, shock of orange hair, and translucent skin, the UK rock star was a perfect choice to play Thomas Jerome Newton, a humanoid from the drought-stricken planet of Anthea who arrives in New Mexico looking for relief for his people and ends up getting sidetracked by TV, booze, money, power, and sex. *******

KISS MEETS THE PHANTOM OF THE PARK

Sure, this Hanna-Barbera-produced TV exercise in cross-promotion from 1978 about an amusement-park mad scientist (Anthony Zerbe) seeking to destroy rock band Kiss through the use of a Gene Simmons robot is the height of corn, but then so was Kiss.

BACK TO THE FUTURE

Say what you will about Robert Zemeckis' 1985 blockbuster – that it's dated, that it's safe, that it opens with Huey Lewis & the News' "The Power of Love" – but there's no arguing that Marty McFly isn't a punk rock hero. Look: 1) He rides a skateboard

everywhere, 2) he gets off fighting jocks in button-down shirts, and 3) he plays his guitar so loudly he destroys his best friend's amplifier. Plus, he single-handedly invented rock & roll. $\star \star \star \star$

VELVET GOLDMINE

The wild tale of David Bowie and his alter ego Ziggy Stardust was reimagined by Todd Haynes in 1998 to critical acclaim and commercial indifference. Starring first-rate British moper Jonathan Rhys Meyers as bisexual glam-rocker Brian Slade and Ewan McGregor as a Lou Reed/ Iggy Pop composite, *Goldmine* remains a passionate and ultimately tragic look into the lives of celebrities lost in the mire between personal identity and selfcreated personality, and buried under the corrupting influences of pop music, Oscar Wilde, and chiffon blouses. **★★★**

WILD ZERO

Asahi, Japan, the year 2000. A space-alien invasion prompts the dead out of their graves as flesh-eating zombies. Only Ace, superfan of Japanese rock band Guitar Wolf, can stop the exploding-head carnage. Zombie-killing garage-punk heroes worth the name, Guitar Wolf has the coolest accoutrements going: leather jackets, greasy pompadours, big guns, loud guitars, bad attitudes, and – most importantly – a motorcycle that spits fire. $\star \star \star$

CHRISTMAS ON MARS

Indie-rock carnival barkers the Flaming Lips take their freak show into space in this self-produced, self-written, self-directed, selfacted bit of lunacy from 2005. Stealing from Stanley Kubrick, David Lynch, and Ed Wood, while adding their own post-rock fantasia, Wayne Coyne and company tell the story of a military officer stuck in a decaying space station on Mars, who attempts to organize a Christmas celebration but finds his plans foiled by a Martian, the untimely death of Santa Claus, and the space-borne madness spreading around him. $\star\star$

MOOG: A REVOLUTION IN SOUND

The organ as we know it dates from the 14th century, Bartolomeo Cristofori invented the piano in 1709, and Robert Moog developed his first synthesizer prototype in 1964. Each left music a completely different beast in its wake.

The young Moog (born in 1934), armed with a physics degree from Queens College, an electrical engineering degree from Columbia University, and a passion for music, started out selling theremin kits. In 1963, he moved to the unlikely upstate New York town of Trumansburg, just north of Ithaca, to set up his business, with an eye toward a new instrument.

By the following year, his first synthesizer was ready. With experimental composer Herb Deutsch supplying musical advice and fellow engineer, musician, and businessman Walter Sear helping with the business end, Moog perfected his instrument for sale. The synthesizer, like most radicalism, lived on the fringe. It took composer Wendy Carlos (then Walter Carlos) and her debut, 1968's *Switched-On Bach*, to bring Moog's invention into the mainstream. Carlos' renditions of Johann Sebastian Bach classics not only became the genre's first platinum seller; it put the synthesizer at the center of America's musical mainstream. Three years later, Carlos followed with the score to Stanley Kubrick's *A Clockwork Orange*.

The keyboard has for centuries been the chosen instrument of composers, starting with the organ, then the harpsichord and clavichord, and finally the piano, the instrument of Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, Prokofiev, and the vast majority of composers in between. While the piano retains its stronghold, the synthesizer and MIDI keyboard have largely taken over. More new scores than not are entered into a computer, using some sort of keyboard and a MIDI connection. Since Moog created his first keyboard synthesizer, the instrument has continued to produce radical offspring, the most important of which are digital synthesizers, using zeros and ones instead of a continuous electronic signal; samplers, using bits of recorded sound stored in their memory; and MIDI controllers, using a standardized digital interface language. Between the three, their effects on popular, experimental, and film music cannot be overestimated. It's a rare day that we go through without hearing a sound that owes its existence to Bob Moog.

Later in life, the inventor settled in Asheville, N.C., building theremins and creating a new keyboard, the Minimoog Voyager. On Aug. 21, 2005, Moog succumbed to a brain tumor, having witnessed in his lifetime the musical revolution he made possible. -G.R.




Roky Erickson: Bleib Alien

Austin Chronicle: What's your favorite science-fiction film? Roky Erickson: Oh, *The Day The Earth Stood Still.* I saw it at the Capitol Theatre, down there on Sixth Street, right next to Congress. And I liked *War of the Worlds*, all the color. It was in something called Fusion Color or Fantasy Color, and everything was red, like the Martians. Haven't seen the new one. I had the *War of the Worlds* comic book. I had lots of comic books.

AC: Do you have a favorite science-fiction author?

RE: H.G. Wells. | liked *Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine*, too. AC: In the past you've been billed as Roky Erickson & the Bleib Alien. What's "bleib"?



RE: "Bleib" is an anagram for Bible. It refers to when Jesus took a walk into the desert and heard someone whispering to him. It was the devil. **AC:** What did you think of the episode of *The X-Files* with the reference to you in it? You were referred to as "Roky Crikenson" in the episode called "Jose Chung's 'From Outer Space.'" **RE:** I've never seen it! **AC:** What's good about modern

science fiction? **RE:** I like the Sci Fi channel and *Science Fiction Theatre.* I've been doing a lot of television-watching and thinking about good songs to write. *– Margaret Moser*

It Came From the Idiot Box

If you were lucky enough to have a television in your backyard bomb shelter on September 16, 1963 – the Havana-happy Russkies having almost gone apocalypto on us a mere 11 months prior – then ABC's 8pm broadcast probably scared the hell out of you. With a hazy sine wave fluxing across your Philco, an ominous voice intoned: "There is nothing wrong with your television set. Do not attempt to adjust the pic-

ture. *We* are controlling transmission."

Though neither Nikita Khrushchev nor Orson Welles was pulling the nation's collective gullibility strings à la *War of the Worlds*, the broadcast turned out to be something even more unsettling: *The Outer Limits*, a sci-fi anthology series

created by producer Leslie Stevens and *Psycho*-scribe Joseph Stefano, featuring a parade of doomy, often nihilistic sci-fi teleplays from the likes of writers Harlan Ellison and Stefano himself.

What grabbed viewers then and continues to do so now was Dominic Frontiere's chilly, minimal-

ist opening theme that – coupled with Vic Perrin's stentorian voice-over – heralded the arrival of *serious* speculative storytelling on the tube. The Cold War wasn't over. It had just moved on to the cathode ray and gone interstellar and omnidimensional.

Televised sci-fi has always gotten a bad rap (Gene Roddenberry's *Star Trek* and the latest, finest incarnation of *Battlestar Galactica* notwithstanding), and for good reason: *The Invaders* was dull, *Lost in Space*

Doctor Who

There's a certain brand of nerdy white guy (like, say, my husband) that grew up in the 1970s/1980s heyday of *Doctor Who*, the protean intergalactic smarty-pants who favored wild hair, scarves, and a spaceship disguised as a blue telephone box. The demographic for the show was narrow, to say the least, but the series was groundbreaking, specifically in the BBC Radiophonic Workshop's use of electronic music. It was the first TV series to have an entirely electronic theme song.

.....

The 2005 reboot of the franchise appeals to a broader audience, due in no small part to the smoldering sex appeal of Dr. Who number nine (Christopher Eccleston) and the nebbishybut-still-hot 10th iteration (David Tennant). The theme music is

cheesy, but incidental music like Britney Spears' "Toxic" and Soft Cell's "Tainted Love" is used to sly effect (both are considered classical music of the mythical future) and helps the series appeal to Generation Xers who didn't spend their adolescence watching the old series on PBS.

Look, too, at the choice of companions since 2005: the Doctor's beloved Rose is played by Billie Piper, a UK pop star/starlet/paparazzi target. The Doctor's 2007 Christmas companion was Kylie Minogue, and this year's Yuletide sidekick will be none other than supermodel/aspiring pop star Agyness Deyn. Seriously, how much hipster/metrosexual cred can one lose watching a dorky sci-fi show that casts beloved icons of the queer nation while ironically employing tracks by Joy Division, David Bowie, Elton John, and the Scissor Sisters? — *Melanie Haupt*

was geared toward Bill Mumy's little sister, and Harlan Ellison's justly forgotten *The Starlost* today plays akin to mainlining Aldous Huxley's soma.

Yet while science fiction on the teevee floundered, what almost always accomplished the incremental construction of emotional unease were the shows' opening themes. Unlike the batty dialogue, clichéd social commentary, and papier mâché sets of Kirk-

era *Star Trek*, it's Alexander Courage's giddy, hopeful, fearless theme that's lodged in the collective unconscious.

Compare that to proto-Brit-rocker Ron Grainer's stridently alien theme from the longest-running televised program in the world, *Doctor Who*, and you'll discover why this perpetually intriguing

program has survived so many iterations. It's allelectronic for one, but in a way that conjures a sense of rapid forward motion, propulsive, dizzying, sleeking through time and space like the TARDIS.

Then there's Kolchak: The Night Stalker: not specifically sci-fi but with all the elements in place, including Gil Mellé's nerve-jan-

gling theme to the short-lived series. Three up, three down: deadpan-alley disgrace notes to Darren McGavin's phantasm-fighting reporter, Carl Kolchak, forever feuding with irascible editor Tony Vincenzo, and making Mulder and Scully look asleep by comparison. An entire generation of pubescent planeteers positively *lived* for this darkest of Friday night lights, and thanks to Mellés' whisper-to-a-scream theme, we still do. Take that, Marshall McLuhan. – Marc Savlov



Black Joe Lewis: The Next Generation

If you've seen Black Joe Lewis & the Honey Bears' white-hot blast of blues recently, you might be wondering why they've taken to wearing shirts from *Star Trek* onstage._

"I saw *The Next Generation* first," the local singer relates, "I even went to a convention with my dad when I was a kid. *Star Wars* is cool, but *Star Trek* is the one I got into the most."

Seems like a stretch to match R&B and Captain Jean-Luc Picard in song, but it isn't for a lack of trying.

"We have an instrumental called 'Enterprise,'" says Lewis. "I've tried to incorporate it into songs, but it hasn't worked out yet. It's hard to write a good song about a TV show."

When we suggest "The Mothership Connection," he agrees: "There's *always* 'The Mothership Connection.'" – Jim Caligiuri

J.G. BALLARD

This seminal Brit crops up everywhere from Joy Division ("The Atrocity Exhibition") to Steven Spielberg (Empire of the Sun). Primarily concerned with inner landscapes of the human psyche rather than space opera.

Start with: High-Rise or Concrete Island: A Novel.

Move on to: Super-Cannes: A Novel.

PHILIP K. DICK

If you've seen Blade Runner, Total Recall, or any of the other films inspired by PKD, you're already familiar with the watered-down version of this famed Berkeley meth-head's tortured fever dreams.

Start with: Ubik or any of his short-story collections

Move on to: Elegiac masterpiece Valis or designer drug nightmare A Scanner Darkly.

NEAL STEPHENSON

Stephenson began with the college hijinks of The Big U and the environmental parable Zodiac, but really hit his stride with the hightech Victorianism of The Diamond Age: Or, A Young Lady's Illustrated Primer.



Start with: Cryptonomicon, the best World War II code-breaking steampunk novel ever. Move on to: The Baroque Cycle, a recently completed three-volume work.

WILLIAM GIBSON

This bespectacled British Columbian got the whole cyberpunk ball rolling along with Austin's own Bruce Sterling, with whom he cowrote the quintessential steampunk book The Difference Engine.

Start with: Neuromancer, the proverbial 800-pound gorilla of cyberpunk. Move on to: Virtual Light or his last, Spook Country: A Novel.

MICHAEL MOORCOCK

This grand old man of British science fiction and part-time Bastrop resident was the editor of New Worlds, the important late-1960s/early-1970s journal that helped start the careers of J.G. Ballard, Brian Aldiss, Norman Spinrad, Kate Wilhelm, etc.

Start with: Mother London, in all its multifaceted glory. Move on to: The Cornelius Chronicles, a four-part motet starring cyberpunk

precursor Jerry Cornelius.



Blake Sandberg: Resident Alien

"I was born in the mid-Seventies, so I'm definitely part of the Star Wars generation," laughs Blake Sandberg, the local life force behind both the band Aliens and the Misc. Music label. Since launching Misc. Music in spring 2007, Sandberg's provided a home for sounds that skirt the outer limits. From bizarre visions by Jad Fair and Daniel Johnston to the raw punk of locals Damage Pants and Aliens, Misc. Music is the mothership for the misunderstood.

"Someone actually stopped me on the street and asked me what planet I was from," laughs Sandberg. "I guess I'm an outsider to some degree, but I'm interested in fitting into society somewhere, so I figured I'd put down my thoughts and sing them - or scream them in front of people and maybe find people I could have a conversation with. And I have!

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"It came down from space, driven and lifted by forces men haven't discovered," wrote John W. Campbell Jr. in the 1938 short story "Who Goes There?" Second-in-Command McReady, "a figure from some forgotten myth, a looming, bronze statue that held life, and walked," continues for the men of this doomed Antarctic mission: "So it crashes, and this guy, whoever he is, gets thrown out, and ends up freezing," he explains in the final-draft screenplay to John Carpenter's The Thing (1982). Frozen in the ice, for millions of years, before roaring back to shape-shifting life "weird and pissed off." ("I just can't believe this voodoo bullshit," grouses Keith David in the film.) Carpenter's update of Howard Hawks' equally bughouse The Thing From Another World (1951) also advances Dimitri Tiomkin's frenzied original score by employing Roman soundtrack emperor Ennio Morricone, recipient of an honorary Academy Award in 2007 for "his magnificent and multifaceted contributions to the art of film music." Morricone's titles tell the tale: "Humanity," "Shape," "Contamination," "Bestiality," and finally, ashes of an American flag,

"Despair." Opening with funereal violins and piano, horns sweating ice-blue angst as strings stoke panic, "Humanity" and its tuba embodies menace without rational-


ization. "Contamination," a contagion of string-plucked hysteria that succumbs to pre-Re-Animator sawed violin, feeds the overpowering "Bestiality." Employing the single-note piano ploy of Carpenter's score for Halloween, "Solitude" leads to "Eternity," which descends with a Phantom of the Opera cathedral organ. Crescendos of string stretch above a coagulating pool of bass on "Wait," prior to "Humanity (Part II)," which both opens and closes Carpenter's remake, its organic pulse of inevitability as taut as a German synthesizer, woodwind warning crowning sustained red organ agony. An Internet bootleg of the soundtrack adds 25 minutes of film score sequenced to the movie. "We came out two weeks after E.T.," reveals Carpenter to his MacReady (Kurt Russell) in the director's commentary on The Thing DVD. "Theirs was sweet; ours was mean.'



THE FLAMING LIPS Yoshimi Battles the Pink Robots (Warner Bros.)

About the time of choreographed 4-CD oddity Zaireeka, Flaming Lips frontman Wayne Coyne probably went a bit mad.



in the 2002 album's title, dissipates after the first four songs, but in that quartet, Capt. Coyne swipes at cynicism and irony via

his vitamin-popping heroine. As existential allegory, it's not Sartre, but then Sartre didn't

write pop songs. And Coyne, with a massive musical assist from Steven Drozd, can take a trivially true (and not particularly cheery) lyric - like "Do you realize that everyone you know someday will die?" - drop it into a lush Lips creation, and turn it into something strangely joyous.

KLAATU (Capitol)

Copping their handle from the humanoid alien protagonist in 1951's The Day the Earth Stood Still (a Keanu Reeves remake is due this

December), Toronto sci-fi prog rock outfit Klaatu had a brief brush with stateside fame in 1977, after a journalist insinuated they were the Beatles in disguise. Klaatu refused to perform live or reveal their identities, which only fanned the rumor. Oddly enough. "Sub Rosa Subway" is the only cut on their 1976 debut that sounds like the Beatles, or more accurately, a Wings outtake. "Subway" lionizes inventor Alfred Beach and his attempt to build a pneumatic railroad beneath Broadway. The debut's "Kumbaya"-styled centerpiece is

"Calling Occupants of Interplanetary Craft," which unabashedly appends itself with the honorific "The Recognized Anthem of World Contact Day." The Carpenters later covered it in an ill-advised stab at relevance. Maybe Karen and Richard should've rendered a spaceship tape-deck rocker like "Anus of Uranus" instead. *** - Greg Beets

FORBIDDEN **ZONE: ORIGINAL MOTION PICTURE** SOUNDTRACK (Varèse Sarabande)

I saw Forbidden Zone on Night Flight as a kid,

and it deeply fucked with my Catholic-schooled head. A sci-fi musical? Animated art porn? Frog people? Only years later did I come to appreciate its low-budget genius and black humor, but it was the score to the film's savage Sixth Dimension, where Hervé Villechaize's the king and Susan Tyrrell his dirty-dealing queen, that turned the blackand-white film neon. His first soundtrack, assisted by the Mystic Knights of the Oingo Boingo, Danny Elfman did most of the scoring, aside from a few Cab Calloway and Josephine Baker tunes. The Knights' mesmerizing reworking of "Minnie the Moocher," crooned by Danny Elfman as the devil; "Love Theme," a duet between Villechaize and Marie-Pascale Elfman; and the loopy, foreboding synth of the theme song all gel together to define a truly damaged work of science friction.

While smartly remaining mostly outside the familiar oeuvre, Rapster's electronica-based David Bowie trib-

ute adds nothing to the canon, while caustically condensing the revolutionary aspects of its subject's transformations into stale beats and hack disco. The lilting lullaby harmonies of Au Revoir Simone's take on Hunky Dory's "Oh! You Pretty Things" opens beautifully unsettling, and credit Kelley Polar for pulling "Magic Dance" from the Labyrinth soundtrack, bad as it is. But Matthew Dear's "Sound & Vision" plays disappointingly close to the hip, Leo Minor's "Ashes to Ashes" is a schizophrenic mess, and Drew Brown drains "Sweet Thing" of its considerable power. Only Nordic avant-jazz trio the Thing completely upends Bowie with its experimental (indistinguishable) retreading of "Life on Mars." At their best, covers should expand the original's possibilities while emphasizing the artist's influential versatility; Bowie needs neither, and Life Beyond Mars is a Thin White Dud. – Doug Freeman

GRATEFUL DEAD Grayfolded (Swell/

During their psychedelic heyday of the late 1960s, the Grateful Dead often centered their second set around a long, spacey,

improvised jam they called "Dark Star." Not only did the song provoke LSD-fueled audiences into the cerebral stratosphere, but its minimal, cryptic

lyrics also infer the heavens: "Dark Star crashes. pouring its light into ashes: reason tatters, the forces tear loose from the axis." For space travelers not satisfied with 30 standard minutes of "Dark Star," there's producer John Oswald's ultimate Grateful Dead fantasy. Using "plunderphonics." Oswald births one seamless, almost two-hour "Dark Star" onto two CDs by piecing together and lavering portions from more than 100 different versions of the song covering a 25-year period (1968-1993). There's even a sizable snippet taken from an Austin show in November 1971. Originally released in 1994 and reissued a decade later, Grayfolded requires no spaceship to appreciate this interplanetary traveling companion. ***

Boone's Farm. Real recognizes real, and on the realest beat, 1996's ATLiens grooves back to the mother ship. As "Two Dope Boyz (in a Cadillac)," Big Boi and Andre 3000 spit "Decatur Psalm," its tales of pimps, players, incarcerated uncles, "flashbacks to the black past" and "pumpin' your gas, still watchin' your back" at 7-Eleven ("13th Floor/Growing Old") atop pristine Organized Noize work. Hollow woodblock pops "Elevators (Me and You)," while rolling vocal samples provide a current for "Mainstream." It's Outkast stuck on their most transcended vibe, "cooler than a polar bear's toenails" and slowed to coalesce 1994's "Plaver's Ball" funk with the freakishness of '98's Aquemini. THE POLICE Ghost in the Machine (A&M)

Sting's lyrics for the Police are best known for psychosexual drama ("Don't Stand So Close to Me," "Every Breath You

Take"), but there's another mode that produced dark songs concerned with war, death, spirituality, and technology. 1981's Ghost in the Machine is the only Police album on which the latter predominates. Released a few months before Blade Runner, the album carries the same muted horror of the coming information age and the final domination of nature by culture and the state. most clearly on "Invisible Sun," "Rehumanize Yourself," and finally, "Omegaman." Simultaneously, the album reveals a powerful vision of escape through spiritual struggle ("Secret Journey," "Darkness") and explosive sensuality ("Demolition Man," "Hungry for You"). Musically, Ghost in the Machine enhances the jam-rock of the Police's early albums with the overproduced artificiality of Synchronicity, a striking synthesis of nature and technology. **** - Daniel Mee

Things look kept, but not over-kept. If it's the fall, when the humidity's broken some, it's the kind of place you can lay back, pull up a piece of shade and take a siesta. Depending on the wind, you may hear the rhythmic clinking of the longnecks on the bottling line or maybe a Union Pacific freight rolling through, but you can get a nap in after lunch if you want. And if the cicadas are still hanging on a little bit, so much the better.


You will not be prodded by a rent-a-cop dispatched from the main security gate because there isn't one. The day I did this, the folks at Spoetzl did not know me from Adam but were fine with my impromptu enjoyment of the brewery grounds-a pair of words which somehow seems too official and cold for this little plot of grass and trees out in front of a building that looks way smaller than you thought it would be before you came here.

If anybody had noticed, they might have thought I'd spent too much time in the Hospitality Room. In fact, at that point, I hadn't even been in there. Or gone on the tour, or eaten barbecue in the break room with folks who have nicknames like Turk and Tool Box and Redbird (a lady) and a half dozen or so of the other people who keep on doing what this place has kept on doing since 1909.

I wanted to listen to what the place had to say before I did any talking or asked any dumb writer questions.

Between the breeze blowing through the trees and the little white house where Kosmos' daughter "Miss Celie" lived for a bunch of years, I figured I could encounter a ghost or two. Or at least a feeling. Failing all that, then at least a good 20 minutes of shut-eye.

If I had gotten out to this little patch 70 or 80 years earlier, there would have been sheep out there. Kosmos always kept 'em. It's

While Iran's leaders saber-rattle and quote the Quran, the country's multitudes of young adults are embracing New Age self-help, as exemplified by the bestselling books and soldout seminars of motivational guru Alireza Azmandian, according to a June *Wall Street Journal* dispatch from Tehran. Though young adults in Turkey and Egypt have stepped up their religious fervor, that is not so in Iran. Said a 25-year-old aerospace engineer, "Religion doesn't offer me answers anymore," but "[Azmandian's] seminar changed my life." The Oprah Winfrey-touted book *The Secret* is in its 10th printing in Farsi, yoga and meditation are big, and advertising abounds on the virtues of feng shui and financial management.

THE CONTINUING CRISIS

At press time, a court in Athens, Greece, was considering a challenge brought by three residents of the island of Lesbos in the Aegian Sea to prevent a Greek gay and lesbian organization from referring to homosexual women as lesbians, arguing that such usage insults their heritage, since Lesbos residents have traditionally been called "Lesbians." On the other hand, Lesbos was also the birthplace of the poet Sappho, a heroic woman among gays and lesbians for her early references to her love of other women.

1) In May, NASA sought subjects for a study into the effects of microgravity on the human body and offered each participant \$17,000 to lie in bed for 90 days straight. 2) In April, England's University of East Anglia advertised for subjects for a study of whether a natural compound found in cocoa could cut the risk of heart disease among diabetic women; the participants must be willing to eat chocolates every day for a year.

• Spare the Gun (Hammer), Spoil the Child: 1) Darrell Walker, 30, was arrested in Bartlesville, Okla., in May after his 8-year-old son told police that his dad routinely shoots him and his younger sister in the legs with a BB gun if they misbehave. 2) Robert Cisero, 46, was arrested in Medford, Ore., in June after (according to police) he hit his teenage daughter in the ankle with a hammer to feign a "skating" injury, for which she could get a prescription for pain medication, which he then commandeered.

• The New York *Daily News* reported in June that members of gangs such as the Bloods and the Latin Kings who become parents are routinely having their babies "blessed" into their gangs in religious ceremonies in which the swaddling clothes are the gang's colors. A nearby customer overheard, pulled out his licensed 9mm handgun, and told Webster, "You are not robbing this bank." Webster insisted, "But I have a bomb." The customer: "I don't care." Webster then quietly sat down in a chair, where he remained until police arrived.



Bright Leaf in Northwest Austin is located on the Balcones Fault Zone. The erosion of the earth's surface that runs from the Red River to the Rio Grande makes the nature preserve a beautiful sight to behold.

After hiking up the single-track path to the top of the horseshoe-shaped ridge, the view of the Colorado River Valley and Lake Austin opens to spectacular dimensions. The Pennybacker Bridge anchors the right corner, and Michael Dell's house peeks from behind the trees on the hilltop on the other side of the lake. Communications towers slice the sky from another hilltop in the distance.

The Balcones Escarpment exposes the limestone layers under our feet and separates the Edwards Plateau from the Coastal Plain. Land once thought too rugged for livestock and too isolated for habitation with soil too thin for crops has sprouted chimneys and back yards.

If you look at a map of Austin, there is a 200-acre blank spot south of RR 2222 and east of the MoPac Expressway. The vacant area stands out among the spiderweb of streets.

From the parking area, Bright Leaf looks like a thick tangle of Ashe juniper, oaks, and underbrush. You have to climb into the spaghetti bowl of vegetation to see the forest for all the trees. "Ashe juniper, or cedar, is the tree that Texans love to hate," says Philip Russell as he leads a group on a tour. The path less traveled seems to be all uphill, but in the humid weekend morning, the smells and sounds of nature seem a million miles away from the city.

The Lucas family bought the first acreage of what became Bright Leaf in the Forties as a country getaway from their Austin home. Georgia Lucas grew up roaming the hills and deer paths with her friends and developed a deep love for the unspoiled forest.

Named after the fall leaves that contrast with the evergreen cedars, Lucas built the isolated property into her own private nature preserve. She acquired the land in 34 real estate transactions spread over 40 years. At 216 acres, Bright Leaf would rank 14th in size among Austin's other parks

After Lucas' death, the land was donated to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department as a natural area and conference center in 1995. Eleven years later, the state decided it could not afford to manage the property, and ownership reverted to the Austin Community Foundation. According to her wishes, the park is only open to the public by guided tours.

The tours are a mixture of strenuous exercise and natural history lessons. Russell stops the group at one of the pools of spring-fed Dry Creek and states, "This is one of the most unique features in the park and one of the most important." The tiny stream provides water to a variety of animals and birds that make Bright Leaf their home.

As the group walks along the narrow path, Russell points out many of the plants along the way. The twisted-leaf yucca, native only to the Texas Hill Country, is in danger of disappearing due to the overpopulation of deer. He describes the plant as a natural sewing kit, with the spine on the end of the leaves acting as needles and the fibers of the leaves the thread. The root even makes a good soap.

In the wild, he says, one small change to the environment can have unintended consequences. The eradication of screwworms in cattle aided the population of deer. The deer eat the oak saplings which would crowd out the Ashe juniper trees. Even plant life in a back yard miles away can be spread by birds carrying seeds to the park where those seeds grow into invasive plants. "It's a never-ending path once it gets started," Russell savs.

Bright Leaf is open for regular guided tours at 9am on the second Saturday and Sunday mornings of each month. Additional hikes can be arranged with prior notice. Hikes go about four miles and last about 21/2 hours. Wear sturdy shoes and bring plenty of water. For more details, call 459-7269 or go to www.brightleaf.org.

My Fascination With Dick and Chubbies

The year: 1985. A not-so-distant past. Our most pressing document of the future, 1984, was already a year ago. The one that still looked forward (Prince's 1999) happened a year before that.

Living in the '80s, no matter how much current nostalgic revisionism deludes, was an exercise in

the grim realization that so many of our worst predictions for the future were coming true. We were programmed to view the present as a future past: The Day After. Star Wars (the movie). Star Wars (the defense initiative). Back to the Future. Beyond Thunderdome. Reagan. Bleak. I had no patience for cuddly mainstream shit like Battlestar Galactica. Who had time for fantasy? Reality was harrowing enough.

The first Philip K. Dick novel I read was Flow My Tears, the Policeman Said, dismissed in many circles as one of his weaker wallowings into paranoia and alienation. But the secondary storyline of "policeman" Felix Buckman and his incestuous and bisexual twin sister Alys, who lead lead character Jason Taverner into a "sex grid" through a time-shifting drug called KR-3, intrigued the hell out of me. It still does: Dick predicted the pervasive and addictive nature of Internet porn. Whoa.

Around the same time, and with a similarly twisted talent for disjointed tale-telling, the Hernandez Brothers were raising the brain bar on comic books with Love & Rockets. Los Bros' confoundingly lifelike portrayals of women (especially lezzies) and sticky forays into mystical realism hooked me. Characters Hopey and


Maggie were lovers. Both were punk rock girls in Hoppers. Calif. They looked and acted like me and my friends, except Maggie happened to be a mechanic. A rocket mechanic. Oh, and a lady wrestler. And, eventually, a building supervisor. But none of these were Maggie's most noted trait.

Margarita Luisa Chascarrillo, one of the most well-rounded and interesting women in comics, with a backstory that makes Bruce Wayne look like a guano pusher, gained her fame in the alt-comic world not for her sexuality, her talents, nor her adventures. And this may be why I love her most of all: Maggie became known throughout comic geekdom for getting fat.

Thanks, Dara. Thanks a lot.

I was feeling pretty good about myself, swimming a bunch of miles at Barton Springs every week. Sure, I'm pathetically slow, but what do you expect? I'm in my 40s! The mere fact that I'm doggedly putting in the miles had seemed worthy of a medal – until **Dara Torres** came along and put all my efforts to shame. My one consolation is that I'm not alone: In making her fifth U.S. Olympic team at age 41, Torres has put every single person on the planet to shame. Were she alive today, **Mother Teresa** would be thinking it's time to get her ass in gear and make something of her life. Just consider:

• Torres broke her first world record 25 years ago.

• She won the first of her nine Olympic medals in 1984, a year before **Michael Phelps** was born.

• Less than four months after giving birth in 2005, she was swimming the 50-meter freestyle – her signature event – in less than 26 seconds.

• She is swimming more than two seconds faster than that today, holding the American record.

• She looks awesome.

Okay, so that last point probably doesn't warrant a bullet. But let's face it: Unless you're a serious professional athlete, what really matters is how you look naked. Or, anyway, how we look in a Speedo. And Torres makes both women and men feel equally insecure about their bodies.

But the writer **W. Hodding Carter** has good news. It's not too late, he says. "We've been told that as we get older, we get weaker. But it turns out that we can put on muscle mass into our 80s. Dara Torres is not some amazing exception. I mean, she is, but that's because of the fire that burns in her, not because she's doing this in her 40s. There's going to be more and more older athletes competing, and winning. It won't be such a big deal. It's just going to be a lot wrinklier."

To prove his point, Carter resolved four years ago that he, too, would qualify for the Olympic swimming team – at the age of 45 – an adventure he chronicles in *Off the Deep End* (Algonquin Books).

Perhaps the mad dream was symptomatic of a mere midlife crisis. Or maybe, Carter told me while in Austin on a book tour, it's just a recognition that age and athleticism aren't necessarily opposed to each other. After all, though he didn't qualify for the recent trials in Omaha – he got a life-threatening staph infection, laying him up for nearly three months – he came damn close, swimming even faster at 45 than he had at 22 as an NCAA Division III All-American at Kenyon College.

"Just because I'm a certain age doesn't mean I should give up on a dream," he said. "Despite all the pain and disappointment, we should still go for it. It's a way of finding our boundaries, and people like Dara Torres show us that those boundaries don't have to be defined by age."

So much for that excuse.



I'm somewhat uncertain as to the source of my confusion, but when I find myself mentally wandering as I watch live story-telling, I tend to look to the actors and, by extension, to the director. In this production, the director and one of the actors happen to be the same person. Robert Salas is credited with conceiving and directing the production and also plays the king as a raving lunatic, which is most likely appropriate given what happens at the end. But while he has an expansive physical presence and a fine speaking voice, Salas' tempo is out of control. The same can be said, to a lesser extent, for J.D. Carrera, who plays the jester. Carrera too has an effective presence and vocal instrument, but he, like Salas, rarely slows down vocally or comes to a stop. Such a quick overall tempo overwhelms the audience with information. We don't know what's important, because the actors aren't allowing us to hear what's important. Thus, the story doesn't engage us, and we drift away mentally, thinking about full cat boxes or uncut hedges or whatever common concerns happen to occupy our thoughts on any given day.

The performance of "Escurial" is prefaced by two short pieces. In one, "Interview With an Actor," an old English thespian is questioned concerning his experience playing various roles in the plays of William Shakespeare. As with "Escurial," Salas plays one part (the actor) and Carrera plays the other (the interviewer), and, not coincidentally, the piece is plagued by the same tempo problems as "Escurial," with yet another distraction: While Carrera's English accent is passable, Salas' simply does not work.

The one thing in the evening that does work is Jolyn Janis' monologue about the nature of illusion, performed between "Interview" and "Escurial." While Janis appeared somewhat nervous, her rumination on storytelling and the nature of the agreement between a storyteller



and an audience, which used a magic trick as a setup, was charming and quite easy to follow because Janis varied her tempo, allowing us to hear what was really important, and occasionally paused to allow us to absorb what she had said. It may be that director Salas coached Janis in exactly that way. If so, he should have taken his own advice and carried it into his direction of "Escurial." – Barry Pineo





Kidnapped by Craigslist

Maybe once upon a time, most men led lives of *quiet* desperation, but I'm here to tell you, Mr. Thoreau, that day is past. Suffering in silence has given way to people spilling their guts, about their lives of desperation and intoxication and indigestion and everything else – and doing so loudly enough for everyone to hear. Most folks these days shout it from their keyboards in electronic public spaces where the whole world can take note of their feelings. You have only to log on to MySpace or Facebook or Craigslist to find a surfeit of humanity sharing deeply personal details of their existences, with topics once deemed taboo for discussion even with one's intimates now openly broached with strangers. Ours is an age of constant confession, and the baring of one's soul knows no bounds.

Observing that confessional culture in action on Craigslist led St. Edward's University grads Katie Goan and Nitra Gutierrez to craft a theatrical compilation of actual posts from the site's New York forums, and the resulting show's success in the Big Apple last summer prompted them to create an Austin incarnation in partnership with Shrewd Productions. The posts for this Kidnapped by Craigslist, most of which are local, are set within the framework of a carnival, with a midway barker (lean, loose-limbed Andrew Varenhorst) enthusiastically directing the audience's attention to its various attractions -The Tunnel of Love! The Fun House! The Auction House! The Secrets Well! - each of which hosts posts of a certain kind. At each stop, Varenhorst and his six fellow performers (Lynn Burnor, Brock England, Chris Humphrey, Pierce Purselley, Bryan Schneider, and co-creator Gutierrez) take turns reciting first-person exposés of the habits of obnoxious co-workers, encounters with lunatic neighbors, dealings with stoned pizza-joint employees, personal compulsions regarding baked goods, sexual preferences, and the like. The carnival framework is effective in setting up a festive atmosphere for these oddball tales and disclosures, most of which are played for laughs, but it also suggests something more extravagant, flashy, and theatrical than what we get here. Most of the individual bits are presented rather modestly - just spoken directly to the audience - and when the performers don't sell them with sufficient comic flair, as sometimes happens, it undercuts both the humor and the sense that what's being presented here is as outrageous and colorfully entertaining in its way as what you'd find on the midway. The bits that work best are the ones that add music or movement to push the posts to a more theatrical level, like the song that begins as a standard romantic ode to one's lover then segues abruptly into a blunt – but still sweet request for said lover to refrain from certain erotic activities involving her posterior. Michelle O'Connor's music saturates the lines in this sappy pop innocence at odds with the subject matter, which adds another level to the humor, and it gives director Jason Hays a reason to stage it as a real musical number, which adds a welcome splash of spectacle.

This carnival is not all fun and games, however. The Secrets Well is Goan and Gutierrez's nod to the fact that Craigslist is a place



where people reveal a lot of their pain and insecurities. The point is well-taken and would probably be missed if it weren't included, but once it's made, the show can't really recover the air of goofy fun it's sought to convey before this. The feeling is a little like the one you get after walking past the sideshow banners advertising oddities of nature to see what they are in the flesh and realizing: They aren't freaks; they're just people. However different they may look, they have dreams and desires and quirks and flaws just like anyone else. And knowing that makes it harder to separate yourself from them, to stand apart and point at their strangeness. Now, that's not to say some people won't be able to enjoy *Kidnapped by Craigslist* purely as a diversion, for the good time that it offers. But whether you can count yourself among them may have a lot to do with how you feel about carnivals. And confessions.

The Wackness

D: Jonathan Levine; with Ben Kingsley, Josh Peck, Famke Janssen, Olivia Thirlby, Mary-Kate Olsen, Jane Adams, Method Man, Aaron Yoo. (R, 95 min.)

In the early Nineties, you couldn't get a sweeter seasonal jam than DJ Jazzy Jeff and the Fresh Prince's "Summertime." This coming-of-age comedy, set in New York circa the summer of '94, uses the song to good effect, although its ode to fraternity, fly ladies, neighborhood barbecues, and family reunions couldn't be further from the reality of Luke Shapiro (Peck). He's a rap-obsessed white



boy, friendless and estranged from his parents, a 17-year-old outcast and dope dealer who trades weed for sessions with his middle-aged, self-medicating shrink, Dr. Squires (Kingsley). Over the course of the summer, Luke and Squires, who's close to cracking up, become friends. They bond over their romantic woes – Luke is obsessed with Squire's casually cruel stepdaughter, Stephanie (Thirlby), while Squire's marriage to the chain-smoking, near-catatonic Kristin (Janssen) is fissuring. Janssen's screen time is pedicidue but it's an unsoftling under the chin per

negligible, but it's an unsettling, under-the-skin performance. She plays the trophy wife like a bone stripped of its meat - hard, inscrutable, and chipping - and it's not difficult to imagine the future of her equally remote daughter (she's but four years at Sarah Lawrence, a brief stint at a Manhattan publishing house, and a couple of failed marriages away from becoming her mother). They're a fascinating pair, but they're not the primary (or even tertiary) concern of writer/director Levine (who previously directed the Austin-shot, as-yet-unreleased All the Boys Love Mandy Lane); the women serve merely as the starter fluid for the men's spectacular flameouts and phoenixlike risings (okay, maybe more Central Park pigeonlike risings). The Wackness' real modus operandi is in exalting the odd couple of Squires and Luke, a Mayor Giuliani-era Falstaff and Hal who just want to act up in a city that's clamping down. It takes some time to get used to both of their performances - Peck's blank face and mumbled delivery are initially off-putting, while the scraggly haired Kingsley sounds like an Eastern European refugee and looks like he belongs in some Cuban bodega, sipping mojitos. But once they get their sea legs, the film hits an easygoing, freewheeling stride, bopping to the beat of an era-specific soundtrack of Biggie and A Tribe Called Quest. The Wackness never lives up to the Fresh Prince's high standards - this isn't a "groove slightly trans-



formed" or a "bit of a break from the norm" – it's standard, straightoutta-Sundance indie fare, but it's also a crowd-pleasing portrait of boys-who-will-be-men-who-will-be-boys. – *Kimberley Jones* ★★★ Arbor

D: Scott Prendergast; with Lisa Kudrow, Prendergast, Teri Garr, Chistine Taylor, Jeffrey Dean Morgan, Chris Parnell, Conchata Ferrell, Angela Sarafyan. (PG-13, 86 min.)

Consider Kabluey a litmus test to administer to your friends and family members, a line in the sand between one view of life and another, an at-longlast, all-in assessment of just what kind of people you've been spending your time with. Those who fall in love with its oddball tale of disheveled thirtysomething Salman (Prendergast) - a schlemiel who loses his job at a copy store after laminating everything in sight and then moves in with his despondent sister-inlaw, Leslie (Kudrow), whose husband, a National Guardsman, is stuck in Iraq and whose two young sons are devil children who pass the time howling at the top of their lungs and destroying things with hammers - are what might be called "lovers of all things quirky" ... and probably aren't to be trusted. Indifferent to character, they'll revel in idiosyncrasies; rejecting emotion, they'll pine for sweetness; unmoved by story, they'll satisfy themselves with endearing peccadilloes and eclectic gestures and meticulous. melancholy set-pieces, accompanied by a soundtrack of easy, yet ironic, nostalgia (in this case, the theme music from Pee-wee's Big Adventure). They'll find Salman's woeful parading around an empty cornfield in a giant, faceless, babyblue Internet-company-mascot costume passing out fliers for \$7 an hour adorable and hilarious and touching, but they won't be able to explain why an Internet company would pay a man to pass out fliers in an empty cornfield. Because the explanation is beside the point. Because the explanation is there is no explanation - beyond the simple fact that Prendergast thought it would make for an engaging image. In fact, I wouldn't be surprised if that blue suit in that open field was the whole inspiration behind Kabluey and that from there Prendergast inched outward to the story of a depressed military wife collapsing under the bone-rattling screams of her two awful spawns and an ever-growing mountain of bills, in order to avoid accusations of avant-gardism and absurdity. As a consequence, his film gets stuck between two worlds, not

really part of either. In one telling scene, Leslie's little angels try to murder their intruding uncle by pouring drain cleaner down his throat while he's sleeping ... which might have had some emotional (or at least Shakespearean) resonance had Salman actually responded with anything resembling anger or disbelief - anything vaguely human, that is. Instead he lies back and takes it like Buster Keaton after an overdose of Nebutal (more dead than deadpan), and the movie continues on as it was, quirky and undisturbed, unaffected and unaffecting. SPACE CHIMPS

D: Kirk De Micco; with the voices of Andy Samberg, Cheryl Hines, Patrick Warburton, Jeff Daniels, Stanley Tucci, Kristin Chenoweth. (G, 81 min.)

Stantey latci, Kistan chenoweth. (G, 81 min.) With an insipidly generic title like Space Chimps, you might expect something along the lines of a Sid & Marty Krofft production, or possibly some sort of The Three Stooges meets Planet of the Apes meets Bob Ray's Ape Sh!t gambit – anything but the frequently laugh-out-loud snarkiness of this (admittedly) uneven but far from awful take on, um, chimps in space. And who doesn't love an animated, anthropomorphized-chimpanzee-starring, sci-fi romantic comedy? (Okay, sure, the legion of bat-maddened fans of The Dark Knight, who have been calling for certain critical heads on a pike outside the gates of Gotham, for starters, but work with me here - it's worth it.) Tolerable G-rated films of the non-Pixar variety which actually offer up some intelligent criticism of the status quo and more than two chuckles per act are generally as rare as life on Mars is presumed to be, but 20th Century Fox's Space Chimps is endearingly ridiculous and frequently smart, and, occasionally, pretty dumb. In short, it's a lot like its target audience of kids with parents in tow or, more inclusively, Homo sapiens. This story of a jaded, selfish, but ultimately heroic circus chimp named Ham III (Samberg), who is plucked from obscurity by NASA and sent into space alongside a pair of real chimp astronauts (for reasons too complicated to get into here), has its share of deep-core cinematic clichés but still manages to be surprisingly unsucky. That's thanks in large part to the excellent voice casting but even more so to the sheer volume of gags, which runs the gamut from digs at the feds ("Thanks for cooperating with your government under threat of prosecution!" holler the G-man and -woman who kidnap Ham from his sideshow home) to easier jabs at Star Trek and, I kid you not, an involved, esoteric bit of Freudian analysis played for no-child-is-gonna-get-this-but-what-the-hell? laughs and the single greatest joke about Barstow, Calif., ever, period. Add to that the utterly psychedelic color palette and the fluid, often gorgeous CGI animation, and you have a film that, in a non-Pixar dominated reality, would be cleaning up at the box office. STEP BROTHERS

D: Adam McKay; with Will Ferrell, John C. Reilly, Mary Steenburgen, Richard Jenkins, Adam Scott, Kathryn Hahn. (R, 100 min.)

Will Ferrell's newest is a lot like Will Ferrell's oldest, which is to say it feels like an old-school (no pun intended) Saturday Night Live skit amped up on a heaping helping of sugar-infused Count Suckula breakfast meth. It's all over the place, and it will make you laugh when you least expect it, but maybe not so much when you do. Ferrell's career thus far has been downright stratospheric in its yet-to-apogee arc. Gems like Elf and the genuinely affecting Stranger Than Fiction have expanded on his clueless man-child schtick much in the mold of former SNL cohort Adam Sandler. But whereas the latter tends too often to wander into the quagmire of oozy sentimentalism, Ferrell apparently has been letting story and gag ideas drip osmotically into his nicely warped brain pan via some sort of surrealistic pillow (so much so that he's now a prime scratch that, the only - candidate to host my dream game show Who's Your Dada?). There's a thin blah line between childlike

and childish, and Ferrell has permanently blurred that little bastard. It's so blurry in Step Brothers, however, that it keeps you off balance, stuck waiting for the next scrotal joke or explosive display of Ferrell's freshly struck but cliché freak-out moment, which can feel like a chore. Step Brothers arrives with assorted choice crew members from Anchorman: The Legend of Ron Burgundy and Talladega Nights: The Ballad of Ricky Bobby in place, including writer/director McKay, cinematographer Oliver Wood, and current comedy godhead, producer Judd Apatow. Ferrell and Reilly play Brennan and Dale, slacker layabouts with the hypercompetitive temperaments of 12-year-old bully-magnets who reluctantly become best stepbrothers forever when Brennan's mom (Steenburgen) marries Dale's dad (Jenkins). Hilarity ensues, obstacles are overcome, and life lessons of the socially inept variety bubble up all over the place like magic mushrooms after a rainstorm. (Come to think of it, Step Brothers may well double as a religious experience for those inclined to arrive in an altered state of mind.) But Ferrell and Reilly's infantilism grows wearying for those of us who've had our fill of dick jokes and child-men run amok. Step Brothers has comic fuel to burn, some of it unashamedly non sequitur and stupid-brilliant, but it still feels like a post-Talladega flameout. Marc Savlov

This second in the Narnia films opens with screams, accompanied by royal treachery, attempted murder, and the flight of Prince Caspian (Barnes) from his castle keep to the forest beyond. This is a far darker film than its lead-footed if well-intentioned predecessor, rife with battles, death, and bloodshed, all shot through an oppressively miasmatic haze. Aslan (again voiced by Liam Neeson) appears only briefly, although Lewis' Christian motifs and metaphors are writ large enough for a blind layman to see. Aside from the scene-stealing, Eddie Izzard-voiced mouse Reepicheep, there's precious little whimsy on display. Adamson's pulled a more morally nuanced rabbit (or badger, actually) out of his directorial hat this time out, and the result is a far more engrossing film than its predecessor. Or so goes the nihilistic logic behind The Dark Knight, a grim little parable on the wages of sin and the high cost of redemption. It's impossible to view Nolan's extravagantly dour film through anything but the prism of Ledger's death. His Joker is the sort of convoluted, densely layered characterization that gets nominated for awards come Oscar time. It's a pity, then, that when taken as a whole, this two-and-a-half hour film is such a stuffy downer. It's jam-packed with flawlessly designed set-pieces and skullduggery, sure, but it's also shrouded in grim portent, overlaid with a filigree of despair, and, for good measure, covered in a patina of dire consequence. In short, it's a Batman for the new age of anxiety. There's something intangible missing from this Dark Knight. For all its thrum and thunder, Nolan's film feels chilly and ill at ease. For my money, I've never seen anything much wrong with the animated Chuck Jones version of this Seuss tale, made for TV in 1970. But everything needs an update. I suppose, and this new animated feature does the job nicely, staying true to the playfulness of the Seussian rhymes and messages while ably adding in new bits of business to expand Seuss' verse to feature length. Carrey's general tendency toward comic mania is gently toned down, allowing the rubbery elephant Horton to seem more a lovable goofball than a frenzied nut job, and Carell's readings as the Mayor of Whoville are perfectly on target. Twentieth Century Fox's animation is in the mold of their previous films Ice Age and Robots: a nice blend of rudimentary and inventive touches. Given the success of that film, del Toro's budget is considerably larger this time, allowing him to indulge his genius for the freakish - Hellboy II is a visually breathtaking bestiary of everything that ever lurked under your childhood bed – while fleshing out the "big red one" and his pals at the Bureau for Paranormal Research and Defense. Co-scripted with wild abandon and plenty of heart by del Toro and the comic book's creator, Mike Mignola, this second Hellboy film outing finds the stogie-chompin', pussycat-lovin', Tecate-swillin' hellspawn defending an unsympathetic-as-ever mankind. The smart, if somewhat overcrowded, script by David Koepp makes allowances for both Ford and his character's advancing maturity while sacrificing none of the series' innate innocence. Quite a feat, that, considering that before the plot even really begins, we're treated to alien beings, a nuclear explosion in the Nevada badlands, and squirrelly, HUAC-style federal agents with pinkos on the brain. 

Bertino creates a palpable sense of fear through the shrewd use of sound, imagery, and performance - often using the bare essence or absence of these rudiments to scare up some truly visceral viewer responses. Younger viewers who've cut their teeth on the instant horrors of modern "torture porn" may find The Strangers slow going. When, without warning, a vessel lands in his back yard and deposits EVE (Knight), a female robot who has been sent to discover if any life has blossomed on the home world, WALL-E (Burtt) is immediately smitten. While the film eventually takes both the 'droids off-world, the story remains focused on their blossoming romance. This is Pixar's finest and most emotionally power ful film yet, by turns sad, hilarious, exciting, and, ultimately, hopeful. Those past science-fictioneers Kubrick, Clarke, and Asimov would've loved it, I think, and I'd wager my first edition of The Martian Chronicles that Ray Bradbury, too, will recognize a kindred soul in WALL-E's life-affirming quest for love. 



"People couldn't believe their eyes, seeing a young girl plaving left-handed! It was so odd for them, both men and women, to see a young black girl, especially around these parts, playing a left-handed guitar and singing the blues." Barbara Lynn started rocking Beaumont clubs while

still in high school, fronting an Elvis-loving all-girl band. At age 20, the soulful southpaw shot from bars to American Bandstand as her self-penned 1962 single, "You'll Lose a Good Thing," bumped Ray Charles from atop the R&B charts.

"My manager and I sort of had a good idea that this song might hit, but we thought 'Lonely Heartache,' the flip side, would go," Lynn explains. "It just so happened that they put 'You'll Lose a Good Thing' for the A side, and it really took off."

Lynn walked away from music in the 1970s, moving to California to raise a family. When she picked up her guitar again in the late 1980s, Clifford Antone was among the first to call

"Clifford would always say, 'Barbara, you need to put all that other music down and come in the studio and let us record a strong blues album with you.' He felt all that other music was just garbage. He said the blues will always be around, and he told the honest-to-God truth."

At 66, nearly five decades since her chart-topping debut, Lynn's career is far from done: "I might be signing up with Daptone Records out of Brooklyn. Boy, they have been calling me."

Lynn cuts a single for the catalysts of Sharon Jones' retro-soul revival in September and hints a full LP could follow. Now that would be a good thing.

NONCOMPETE AGREEMENTS

I was laid off by a technology start-up. During the termination paperwork process, I noticed a statement that I had to sign stating that I was to agree not to work for any direct competitor for a period of 12 months from the date of my termination. Upon refusing, I was presented the stack of first day paperwork I signed showing that I signed this exact statement already. Can a company who let me go prevent me from making a living in the same field?

This is a timely question for the Austin job market The devil is in the details surrounding the contract you signed, what training or information your employer shared with you after you signed, and what sort of work you will be doing in your new job. Currently, Texas law allows an employer to prevent a former employee from working in the same field, if:

- 1) the agreement is limited in time, geographic area, and scope of activity; 2) the limitations are reasonable and don't impose
- restraints greater than necessary to protect the business interest of the employer: and
- 3) the covenant is "ancillary to or part of an enforceable agreement at the time the agreement is made" - a highly technical legal issue that Texas courts have struggled with for many years.

Whether the limitations contained in a covenant not to compete are reasonable is an issue that the court will decide. Courts can, and often do, rewrite unreasonable covenants to make them enforceable

Historically, courts strongly scrutinized noncompete agreements and rarely upheld them. More recently, employers have had more success, especially when the employer has shared confidential company information with employees or has trained employees subsequent to the signing of the agreement. Noncompete agreements are increasingly common, especially in high tech markets like Austin.

In short, you will need a lawyer to review your contract, especially the limitations your employer wants to impose on your future employment, the circumstances in which you signed the contract, what sort of training or confidential information your employer gave you after you signed the noncompete agreement, and what sort of work you will be doing for your new employer.

Employers concerned with protecting their trade secrets confidential information, and other business interests need to carefully consider their employment policies and agreements. A sound employment strategy should be developed and may integrate a combination of noncompete agreements, confidentiality and nondisclosure agreements, nonsolicitation agreements, as well as considerations for the protection of your company secrets under Texas trade secret law.

ENGINE'S HOT PROBLEM MAY BE COOLING FAN

Dear Tom and Ray:

I was coming home from bowling the other night, and I passed my buddy going down the road. So we stopped in the road and were talking. Then all of a sudden he asked me, "What the heck is that?" I looked up at my engine, and it was either steaming or smoking. I was worried, so I popped the hood, and we opened it up. You definitely could smell antifreeze burning, and the smoke was coming from the radiator. Do you think that I have a bad radiator and need to replace the entire thing? Now there is antifreeze coming from under the car, so someone told me to put Bar's Leaks in the radiator. Oh yeah, I have a 1991 Pontiac 6000 LE, with a V-6. – Travis Thanks

RAY: I'd start by checking the simple stuff first, Travis. The thing I'd suspect first would be the cooling fan.

TOM: Let's say, just for the sake of argument, that your cooling fan bit the dust at some point. Like in 1998. Or last week. You might not have noticed, because as long as you're moving, air is flowing through the radiator and helping to cool the engine.

RAY: It's only when you stop, say, at a railroad crossing to let a 200-car freight train go by or to chat with your buddy that you really need the cooling fan to simulate the airflow you normally get when the car is moving.

TOM: So, while you sat there chatting for five, 10, 15 minutes, with no cooling fan, the engine was getting hotter and hotter. Finally, it overheated, your coolant boiled over, and that boiling coolant blew a hole in a weakened hose or maybe even the radiator itself. That explains the steam, the smell of hot coolant, and the puddle under your car.

RAY: Now, it's possible that with a car this old, you may need a cooling fan, a new hose, a new radiator, and a new engine, as well. So there are no guarantees here, Travis. But start with the simple, inexpensive stuff first, and take it a step at a time.

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

march. Plus, if you want to get down to the ugly truth of the matter, it's a little

braggy: Texas, our Texas, all hail the mighty state!/Texas, our Texas, so wonderful, so

great! Sounds like a state with a chip on its shoulder. Sounds like a state trying to

hide its inadequacies. Oklahoma, on the other hand, is a study in stately humil-

ity: You're doing fine, Oklahoma. Oklahoma, OK! Notice the omission of superla-

tives like "boldest" and "grandest." Really, there's no need to make Kansas and

Rhode Island feel shitty. You're doing best, Oklahoma? Not even Okies are that

gullible. They will, however, concede that the "wind comes sweepin' down the

plain" (that ain't bragging; it's the brutal truth) or that "the wavin' wheat can

sure smell sweet." Can sure smell sweet - meaning, it's conditional. There are

plenty of situations where it doesn't smell sweet - like when your wheat field is

downwind from a seaboard hog processing plant. If you live next to one of those

babies, the wind coming right behind the rain is about the worst possible thing

that can happen to you - well, short of actually working in the bastard. But still,

it's not really fair to compare Texas, our Texas, with Oklahoma! The former was an

amateur work composed by British-born TCU choir director William J. Marsh,

with lyrics by Gladys Yoakum Wright, described by various publications as a

"resident of Fort Worth." Curious, considering she was employed in the office

of the auditor of revenues for the Frisco Railway in St. Louis, Mo., when she

accepted her half of the \$1,000 prize for writing Texas' state song. Who knows
