SXSW Film lines 'em up

What SXSW Film Hath Wrought

When famed independent filmmaker Eagle Pennell died in July 2002, a wake was organized at the Alamo Drafthouse, where his first classic indie feature. The Whole Shootin' Match, was shown. The sound on the print was terrible. This kicked off a quest to find a decent print, but none could be found in any format. The film is fun to watch, but it is also important: It's one of the very first regional independent American films. It proved a catalyst for so much that followed, inspiring Robert Redford to start the Sundance Institute as well as a generation of young filmmakers to go out and make their own films. It excited critics, played festivals, had theatrical runs, and was a hit in Europe.

Somewhere along the way, Mark Rance and I partnered in this search. Mark found a pristine print in Germany. The film was transferred and improved. A rough version was premiered at the South by Southwest Film Festival a couple of years back. It was the first time a good copy of the movie had shown in decades. A near-final version screened at a later SXSW Film.

Now, after almost two decades, Eagle Pennell's legendary film, long thought lost, is available for the first time on DVD. Watchmaker Films has released a special package that includes *The Whole Shootin' Match*, Eagle's short film "A Hell of a Note," a documentary on Pennell, a bonus soundtrack CD, and a 48-page booklet. Locally, this package is available at Waterloo Records. It has earned rave reviews and should be available at better video and DVD stores everywhere. If you don't see it, be sure to ask!

SXSW 2009, My SXSW

It's about two years ago in Toronto at the film festival. I'm waiting for my friend Michael Hollett, publisher and editor of NOW, Toronto's weekly, to show up with tickets to get a friend and me into Man From Plains, Jonathan Demme's documentary on Jimmy Carter. It's getting late, but Michael still hasn't shown; I've tried every way I know to contact him. Jimmy and Rosalind Carter are going to be at the screening. Michael is good friends with the Sony Pictures Classics guys, whose movie this is, so I figure Michael is in the back talking to one of the Carters and has forgotten about us. Maybe one minute before the film starts, Michael is at the front door of the theatre, making all kinds of apologies and hustling us along. He says he has been talking to the Carters but only for five minutes. Later, when he writes about his meeting in NOW, he will mention that he was talking to them for a half hour, which is what I figured all along.

Moving quickly, we burst into the backstage area. Bursting in proves not to be the cleverest move, as several Secret Service agents traveling with the ex-president seem extremely unhappy upon seeing us enter. The Sony Classics guys are unhappy as well, probably because the Secret Service guys are that way. It is an awkward moment.

A young man comes over to me to say: "Hello, I'm Jimmy Carter's grandson. I had a film at the South by Southwest Film Festival. It was a terrific experience." Everybody in the room relaxes.

In the middle of being interviewed, I hear over the *Chronicle* intercom system that Elliot Roberts' office is on the phone for me. I break off the interview. Elliot is one of the smartest people I've ever met. He is Neil Young's manager. The list of artists that he has managed over the years is stunning. He's calling to see if SXSW Film will show *Neil Young Trunk Show*, Jonathan Demme's new Young performance film. This is the third or fourth time we've worked together in conjunction with SXSW over the years.

When I slip into one of my reactive, defensive modes, I should remember incidents like these, which happen all the time. On occasion, someone is heaping so much praise on SXSW in the course of an unexpected encounter that I'm embarrassed. I'm comfortable with neither praise nor compliments.

SXSW 09 kicks off on the cover date of this issue. It's the 23rd SXSW since we started in 1987. Back then, the energy and anticipation was so explosive that it was like a weeklong, nonstop electric storm, with lightning exploding across our interior skies; calling it "disorientation" would be a weak way to describe the hyper, sometimes almost unreal, mental state. Now, the excitement is still there: it's a lot more modulated, but there is still the thrill at the fireworks show of creative explosions that will go on all over Austin from March 13 to 22. SXSW is not about us; it is of Austin and about the amazing number and extraordinary range of talents who come together and interact during the event.

SXSW Music Wristbands

A limited number of \$165 wristbands will be put on sale at Waterloo Records starting Saturday, March 14, when it opens at 10am, until they sell out. One per customer, and the wristband must be fastened on the wrist at time of purchase. Please be mindful of Waterloo's neighbors, and don't park in inappropriate lots.

There will be more \$165 wristbands on sale beginning Wednesday, March 18, at certain SXSW Music Festival venues, including the Austin Music Hall and Stubb's, as well as several more. 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




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'CHRONICLE' ABANDONED WATCHDOG ROLE

Dear Editor,

Re: "City Rejects FixAustin Charges" [News, March 6]: I have to believe that at one point, the *Chronicle* played the role of city watchdog, a role necessary given the *Statesman*'s conservative predisposition to avoid angering city leaders. This story shows, yet again, that the *Chronicle* has abandoned that role on Austin animal-sheltering issues in favor of attacking community advocates who lend their voices to Austin's lost and homeless pets.

It is worth noting that the *Chronicle* did not contact FixAustin.org to verify facts for this story, and it is therefore unsurprising that the reporter gets the order and nature of the events wrong (e.g., the Lurie memo was in response to e-mails following two shelter-staff presentations, not a website posting purportedly leading to council phone calls). But the *Chronicle*'s inaccurate portrayal of the facts is less important than its spin.

Indeed, if you read the article closely, you'll actually see that the FixAustin.org memo was entirely accurate, not "a false alarm."

It reported two things: 1) The proposed animal shelter will have 20 fewer "adoption" kennels for dogs, and though the shelter staff

argues their larger size will allow for greater capacity, that claim is difficult to believe given that the shelter staff leaves 100-plus cages empty as it kills healthy pets every day at the Town Lake Animal Center; and 2) shelter staff is still considering building an animal incinerator at the East Austin site.

All of those assertions are true. The city is planning fewer cages in the dog "adoption" area at the new shelter. The current shelter management does leave more than 100 cages empty as it continues to order the killing of healthy pets at TLAC. And the city is still considering building an animal incinerator at the new shelter site in East Austin.

Given the veracity of FixAustin.org's statement, it is just plain odd that the *Chronicle*'s headline is that the charges were "Reject[ed]." They weren't; they were confirmed.

If the *Chronicle* at one point provided a critical eye on city government, it doesn't anymore – at least not on animal-sheltering issues in Austin. It now provides the role of pound cheerleader. And that's a shame for the roughly 10,000 lost and homeless pets who will be killed there this year – especially given that more progressive shelters around the country no longer kill animals at the terrible pace that Austin does.

[News Editor Michael King responds: Ryan Clinton is correct that there were more public communications about the shelter plans than simply the FixAustin Web postings, e-mails, and the city memorandum. That makes it even more puzzling why his e-mail blast referred to a "leaked" memo that is in fact a readily available public document. The sole explanation is that it sounds more secret and sinister. FixAustin's e-mail, in deliberately inflammatory and misleading language, claimed 1) that the city plans fewer kennels than those at the current site; and 2) that the shelter would include a "massive industrial animal incinerator at the East Austin site" with the result "that children in East Austin will be breathing in the ashes of dead animal bodies for decades to come." The city responded 1) that the new kennels would in fact accommodate more animals in more humane conditions; and 2) that the city is considering a small crematory (there or elsewhere) to eventually replace the current practice of transporting animal carcasses to a private landfill. Clinton now claims the city's responses confirm FixAustin's highly exaggerated charges. Readers can make their own judgment.]

SHOULDN'T SCOFF AT ALBUM


Dear Editor,


Come on, FixAustin, let's work on "fixing" the source of the problem instead of quibbling about shelter location.



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

VOTE YES FOR MEDICAL MARIJUANA

This year Rep. Elliott Naishtat filed medical-marijuana bill House Bill 164, offering medical patients who have their doctors' recommendations to use marijuana an affirmative defense in court. Numerous prestigious medical organizations support legal medical-marijuana access for the seriously ill, including the American Public Health Association, the American Nurses Association, and the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. Studies have shown that marijuana relieves debilitating symptoms including nausea, appetite loss, and severe pain. It has been shown to increase the chances that HIV/AIDS and hepatitis C patients will stay on life-saving medications. It also treats the patients' common symptoms of depression. Many of the legal alternatives proposed by opponents of medical marijuana are too expensive, too addictive, and have too many side effects to be good medicine for all patients. These are all concerns for patients, and all options should be on the table when the patient makes the final choice. Ultimately, the decision of what medicine is best for an illness should be left up to the patient and the doctor, not to the government or corporate interests. A 2004 Scripps Howard poll showed 75% approval for medical marijuana among the 900 Texan respondents. All Texans should know about this important bill. I want to encourage your readers to write their representatives and urge them to vote "yes" (or "no," if that is the case) on HB 164.

WHO OWNS THE WATER?

- No surprise here Texas leads the nation in the number of homeless children, according to the latest findings of the National Center

Indelicate Balances

Political compromise depends on who's holding the cards

It's a commonplace of political commentary (often nearby in these pages) that the U.S. Constitution and the American political system generally provide invaluable "checks and balances" that prevent hasty or precipitous government actions or the inevitable domination of public policy by special or minority interests. That's true enough, as far as it goes - in a remarkably diverse country of 300 million people with an enormously broad range of often wildly competing interests, it's only point reasonable to believe that it takes a lot of compromising to determine priorities and to get anything done. Yet the other side of that coin, one that pundits often fail to acknowledge, is that under this system, it's often a lot easier to get the bad things done than the good ones.

Witness just the last eight years in Washington. In a frenzy of bipartisan hysteria, the U.S. twice engaged in undeclared (and unfinished) war with little official dissent, abused conventional government accounting and (rather than raise taxes) looted the Treasury to fight those wars, ceded regulation of the economic system to the bankers and speculators, and then panicked when the inevitable bubbles began bursting and the house of cards collapsed. Now that all that's done, a new administration, elected on the

promise of new ways of doing business, is trying to pick up the pieces – and those same checks and balances that failed so badly to stop the disasters are suddenly in play to delay the reconstruction.

Consider, for just one example, the policy gridlock in the U.S. Senate, which now routinely requires 60 votes instead of a simple majority

to override potential filibusters. For some reason, Democrats who generally could not, when in the minority, muster 41 votes to derail Republican initiatives, now can only muster the 60 required to move forward on major economic legislation by handing the policy keys to a couple of "moderate" GOP senators. Setting aside for a moment the merits of the overall Obama administration's stimulus speaking as a noneconomist, I can only hope

plan – speaking as a noneconomist, I can only hope they're doing enough to get us out of the ditch – why is it that U.S. economic policy should be held hostage, and diminished, by a couple of minority voters of the party that lost, overwhelmingly, the last two federal elections?

In this context, recall that the 18th century Constitution granted equal Senate representation to vast ranges of mostly empty state territories that now CONTINUED ON P.19

- > FIRE DEPARTMENT BUDGET CUTS ON HOLD City Manager Marc Ott's proposal to cut Fire Department overtime by going from four- to three-person staffing on select engines has been put on hold. The solution, saving \$200,000 in overtime, was presented as an alternative to cutting library hours in the face of a \$20 million budget shortfall. However, pressure from the public; council members, including Mike Martinez; and firefighters themselves led to postponing the proposal. In a press conference prior to last week's council meeting, Austin Firefighters Association President Stephen Truesdell announced he was "very surprised to hear one of the first things proposed were cuts in Fire Department truck staffing." New Fire Chief Rhoda Mae Kerr stood with Ott at a press conference later that day when Ott announced he would delay implementing his "flexible staffing" changes. Noting his proposal would have only affected "one to three units out of the 50 to 60 on shift," he nonetheless said he would defer implementation to allow "opportunities for the community to provide feedback." Kerr said fire service would not have been compromised "by the very minimum amount [of cuts] we were talking about" but promised to proceed in taking public input. The format for public feedback is still being worked out. - Wells Dunbar
- > AUSTIN LOSES MORE JOBS Some disquieting local economic indicators: The Texas Workforce Commission reports that the combined Austin/Round Rock area lost 12.800 jobs in January, raising unemployment to 6.4% locally. The Capital Area Workforce Development Board also pointed out in a press release that the leisure and hospitality industry, "normally one of the strongest sectors," hemorrhaged 3,100 jobs in January. Sounds like the hotel-stuffing South by Southwest can't get here soon enough. According to commission Chair Tom Pauken. "The national economic crisis is beginning to have a serious, negative impact on our Texas economy."
- > EVOLUTION DEBATE COMES TO ALLANDALE Give him credit for going into the lion's den: Jonathan Saenz of the Free Market Foundation, a leading proponent of teaching so-called "weaknesses" of evolution, made his case Saturday at an Allandale forum on that controversy, which has been big at the State Board of Education recently. The audience mostly complied with the moderator's request to be respectful except for one guy who tried to seize control of the forum and called Saenz a liar - but by the end, it was clear that the patience of many (including some biology teachers) had worn thin with Saenz's not-quite-truthful claims. At one point, he waved a Zogby poll showing that 78% of Americans support teaching weaknesses - without explaining that the poll was commissioned (and the questions written) by the anti-evolution **Discovery Institute**. When an audience member called him out on it, Saenz defended himself by pointing out that the other side (the anti-religious-right Texas Freedom Network) had also used polls but neglected to say TFN's poll was of professional biologists. He also claimed that the drive to remove the "weaknesses" language had originated with TFN. The recommendation actually came from an SBOE-appointed panel of educators and scientists. "I guess he thinks we're the masterminds of a great conspiracy to take the language out," says TFN's Dan Quinn. "Great! I hope he tells our donors." - Lee Nichols

WHO READS THE 'STATESMAN'? NOT ITS EDITORS.

Hit job on Leffingwell wrong on facts **BY WELLS DUNBAR**

Reverse engineering – used for such noble purposes as cracking software and transforming torture survival techniques into water-boarding – has now entered the mayoral race. As applied in this capacity, reverse engineering is a technique familiar to regular Austin American-Statesman readers: A scribe is assigned a topic, the feature runs, then, using the supposed newsworthiness of the story as an excuse, the editorial board weighs in with a searing indictment. (You may recall similarly manufactured crises, such as toxic chemicals poisoning Barton Springs; Will Wynn the iet-setting, do-nothing mayor; or Jennifer Kim, the airport prima donna – the latter won a news/editorial/John Kelso trifecta!)

The story in this instance, "Leffingwell suggests city revisits tax breaks" (March 5), says Council Member Lee Leffingwell, running for mayor, "said at a recent debate that the city should pursue new deals" with incentive-receiving businesses like the **Domain** "before asking the city's police, firefighters and EMS unions to give up any pay raises they have negotiated." Ouotes from Brewster McCracken and Carole Keeton Strayhorn attacking the idea follow, along with the obligatory reminder that Leffingwell's been endorsed by all three publicsafety unions.

Having set that frame, the next day the editors pounced - with the inexplicably headlined, "Help an Austin cop. Help a firefighter. Burn our bridges." Declaring that Leffingwell's suggestion "can't be separated from political aspirations," the editorial gets more personal: The eds depict Leffingwell and Mike Martinez as willing to "endanger jobs" to "score political points," as wanting unions to "have their millions of dollars in raises and overtime at any cost," and more. "That's leadership?" the article whines. "Please. What they are proposing is absurd" and an "outrage."

It's an angry screed – and a reminder why one shouldn't let anger cloud judgment. Facts are retrofitted, contorted, and mauled to agree with a predetermined position - thus the promotion of Leffingwell to "union leader" (a longtime union member, he's never led one). More foolishly, the eds embarrass themselves on local political knowledge, contending that Leffingwell "strongly supported" the Stop Domain Subsidies-sponsored Proposition 2 (in last fall's campaign). All Arnold García or Alberta Phillips or David Lowery or Bruce Hight had to do was glance at the Statesman's own SDS coverage to learn Leffingwell was one of the public faces of the anti-Prop. 2 campaign.

The Statesman ran a half-assed correction the following day, which only further clouded the issue by collapsing the incentive history. ("Leffingwell said at the time he was against the subsidy but opposed the proposition because of its potential for litigation.") The candidate was, at least, afforded an op-ed to point out the larger factual inaccuracies. Starting by comparing the States-

man and the National Enquirer, he recounts essentially what he said at the debate: that before any union members would agree to reopen their contracts to have their pay decreased (as McCracken had just suggested), "I believe the city would have to demonstrate a willingness to revisit its other contractual agreements, too - including its tax incentive agreements."

Leffingwell's exact words at the debate - captured by the Hustle's cameras - were (more completely): "First, we cut the pay of every senior city official from department-head level up. ... We take the cut first. Second, we go to those businesses and companies that we currently have economic-development incentive programs with and say, 'We're in tough times; we want to renegotiate your contract too, to reduce it, to add some more money to our budget.' When we've done those two things, then I think we have credibility when we go to the police and the fire and EMS unions and say, 'Hey, we've done our bit, now we want to ask you to do yours." As articulated, Leffingwell's is a negotiating tactic - and a specific response to those who would simply say, "Let's cut employee pay."

> This is the first real patch of campaign turbulence, and the McCracken team is now looking to make a larger wedge out of the issue. (McCracken is opposed to touching economic agreements, preferring instead to revisit salaries if needed - but with many of those salaries under contract, it's easier said than done.) McCracken's campaign adviser, Colin Rowan, charges Leffingwell is subtly "changing

what he said," positioning himself as wanting the whole city "to share in the sacrifice" in his Statesman op-ed,

when what he said at the forum demonstrated a "clear progression of chronological priority" in hitting up the unions last.

Leffingwell responds that a big cost driver of public-safety salaries was 2003's "public safety premium," a now-maligned agreement that guaranteed public-safety responders 2% above civilian city-employee raises - a step that occurred before he joined the council. "I don't want to disparage my opponent in this contest, but he was the proponent of that. So he actually advocated for that. ... It backfired on the city and ended up costing us a heck of a lot of money over the next few years."

As for the editorial, Leffingwell said he "assumed that Alberta Phillips wrote it," although he isn't 100% certain. "There's a couple of really serious cop-haters down there, and several of them are real serious union-haters, too. I know David Lowery's really strong on that. ... They can have a point of view, but to be downright abusive is one thing, and then to tell things that are completely untrue is another."

So much for the Statesman endorsement, Lee.



have smaller populations than House congressional districts, a polarization since greatly exaggerated by two centuries of urbanization – meaning that two senators from Wyoming (520,000) or North Dakota (640,000) weigh equally with the two senators from New York, California, or Texas, effectively giving Senate veto power to small minorities (and unrepresentative interests) of voters.

That's definitely a "check," I guess. "Balance"? Not so much.

One Man's Check ...

Here at home, this week the Capitol witnessed the state Republican senators riding roughshod over Senate traditions and procedural rules – those "checks" again, on the blink – in order to ramrod a voter ID bill that

will structurally suppress minority (i.e., mostly Democratic) voting. You might have thought the economy and the budget would take precedence over partisan jockeying, but with a new census on the horizon, public officials want more ways to preselect their voters. And

though Texas "minorities" now in fact outnumber their white compatriots, they remain effectively powerless to "check" this official assault on their civil rights.

That brings me by degrees to the city's current budget predicament, which at first appears to be just another instance of the annual debate over local priorities, exacerbated unusually this year by the national economic meltdown. So we find ourselves, once again, in an often bitter public argument over what we can afford (or afford to cut), trying to decide what's more valuable or absolutely necessary. Predictably, the city's already rather minimal support for social services lands at the bottom of the list, but a great many other important public functions also come up short or go begging altogether: code enforcement, park and greenspace maintenance, long-term planning, and so on (pick your own priority; you can be certain it took a hit).

Following the Money

Yet while the city deals as it must with the facts and funding on the ground, it's worth remembering that larger "checks and balances" helped create the current emergency. The state (those Republican legislators, again) not only limits how much money cities can raise from one year to the next - regardless of actual municipal needs, city to city - it has also put harsh indirect limits on city budgets by refusing to adequately fund public schools. Austinites have responded consistently by endorsing school district bond and tax initiatives, and that's in fact where most of the property-tax bite goes - but that has made City Council members even more reluctant to raise city tax rates, knowing that taxpayers, pinched on all sides, do not necessarily dis-

tinguish one revenue stream from another. Neither will the state seriously fund mass transit nor defend environmental priorities nor certainly pay for city infrastructure with the generosity it once liked to lavish on suburban highways – and all these needs roll downhill, to be

confronted (and somehow paid for) by city planners and city taxpayers.

The council, this one and its predecessors, is not off the hook. The politicized reluctance to raise taxes beyond the rollback rate in flush times – or even the eagerness to cut the rate and rely instead on rising property values to make ends meet – now leaves the city with a historical backlog of unfilled needs that might have been better addressed when we were in high cotton.

But when you find yourselves arguing with your neighbor (or your public officials) about who and what is more important – firefighters or librarians, for painful example – don't forget that the terms of the argument have too often been predetermined down at the Capitol, or far beyond Austin city limits, by "checks" written elsewhere and "balances" weighed with somebody else's thumb on the scales.

AFTER ALL-NIGHTER, SENATE PASSES VOTER ID

And you thought Democrats hated DeLay. No, not the disgraced ex-Congressman – lowercase "delay." They love that.

After a marathon 24-hour session, on Wednesday the Senate passed **Senate Bill 362**, which would require voters to show photo ID in addition to their voter registration card at the polls. The bill passed 20-12 along party lines, with Lt. Gov. **David Dewhurst** taking the unusual step of casting a vote.

The actual vote was preceded by an even more unusual "committee of the whole," composed of the entire Senate, a parliamentary maneuver so that testimony could be heard. Democrats did everything they could to slow the process, hammering bill author Troy Fraser, R-Horseshoe Bay, with questions and keeping invited and public witnesses on ice for more than five hours. The testimony, once it finally began, took about 15 hours, not ending until Wednesday morning. Sen. Leticia Van de Putte of San Antonio said the delay was necessary so that Democrats could thoroughly document their case for litigation that will surely arise if SB 362 becomes law.

Democrats are determined to stop the voter ID bill, which they prefer to describe as "voter suppression." While Republicans insist the measure is essential to stop voter fraud, Dems point out that voter impersonation (the only kind of fraud an ID might stop) is an almost nonexistent crime and that instead the measure will disproportionately affect the poor, the elderly, women, and minorities - groups which tend to vote Democratic. "Voter ID takes out 3 to 4 percent from Democratic candidates in any election," said Van de Putte. "Six to eight years ago, the Republicans weren't clamoring for this, when they were winning. Now that the margins are slimmer," she said, the GOP is treating this as a critical issue.

Fraser actually tried to use a legendary Democrat to push his bill: Jimmy Carter. He extensively quoted the 2005 Carter-Baker commission's report on electoral reform, in which the expresident teamed with former Secretary of State Jim Baker and called for a federal voter ID system. El Paso's Eliot Shapleigh threw a Carter quote (from a New York Times op-ed) back in his face: "Since we presented our work to the president and Congress, some have overlooked almost all of the report to focus on a single proposal - a requirement that voters have driver's licenses or government-issued photo IDs. Worse, they have unfairly described our recommendation." (The Carter-Baker reform would have provided such IDs, not placing the onus on the individual voter, as does the GOP initiative.)

Fraser also praised a similar voter ID law in Georgia as a successful model. Shapleigh again went to the same op-ed: "We consider Georgia's law discriminatory," Carter and Baker wrote.

Fraser had the chutzpah to assert his bill would raise turnout: He pointed to Indiana, which has the strictest voter ID law in the nation but also had the fifth-largest turnout increase in the nation – and the greatest among Democrats – between the 2004 and 2008 presidential elections. The increase, he said, was because "people felt their vote was secure." Laredo's **Judith Zaffirini** pointed out the obvious: Perhaps the increases were due to the Obama phenomenon, "and perhaps without voter ID the turnout would have doubled or tripled."

The bill now moves to the House, which, with a 76-74 party divide, could provide for some actual drama. For more up-to-the-minute coverage, see our Capitol blog, austinchronicle.com/legeland.

Last week, brushing aside pleas from environmentalists, anti-tollers, and some legislators to delay and re-evaluate its road plans – and ignoring concerns that it might be violating the law – the **Texas Transportation Commission**, which oversees TxDOT, committed \$1.2 billion in federal stimulus money to various roadway projects around the state. This follows previous approval of \$500 million in stimulus money for maintenance projects.

It ended a rough week for TxDOT but may have been only the beginning of a rough legislative session for the agency, which faces Sunset review this year. Early in the week, Waco Rep. **Jim Dunnam**, chair of the **House Select Committee on Federal Economic Stabilization Funding**, tore into TxDOT Executive Director **Amadeo Saenz** when the latter admitted that, despite what the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act requires, his organization had not consid-

ered "economically distressed areas"
when prioritizing how to spend the
\$500 million. "We are subject to
being charged back this money if
y'all don't spend it in compliance
with statute," Dunnam complained.
Later, Houston's **Garnet Coleman**read a resolution on the House floor
declaring that "the failure of the commission and the department to conduct
the people's business in a fair, open, and
accountable manner has lost them the confi-

because some felt the language was a bit much, but the point was made.

To ameliorate the concerns, TxDOT retroactively added 10 projects to the original 266 maintenance items, all in counties meeting the economically distressed area definition. On the new roadway projects, the department added six to the original 23 staff recommendations, four of which are in economically distressed areas.

It was pretty obvious early on how the commission would vote. Local officials pleaded with commissioners to approve projects in their areas, and more than one jokingly were asked by **Ted Houghton** of El Paso, "So you'd like us to delay this, right?" When environmentalists and anti-toll-roaders went to the mic, Houghton lost his smile and became combative, calling one a "bigot" for objecting to foreign-owned toll roads.

The changes did not mollify Dunnam, and it's not clear if they'll satisfy the feds, either. "The requirement of the federal act is, before approving any projects, they give priority to economically distressed areas," Dunnam said. "They went in after the fact and added a few for appearances' sake." Asked the question many have wondered for years - "Is TxDOT out of control?" - Dunnam said: "No, I think frankly the governor is out of control. They report to him, they are really accountable only to him, and he continues to drive this toll-road agenda right down everyone's throat despite overwhelming public opposition, overwhelming opposition in the House and Senate. Blaming TxDOT is really missing the big picture."

In 2007, Rep. Ellen Cohen, D-Houston, authored House Bill 1751, levying a \$5 surcharge per customer entering a sexually oriented business where alcohol is served. The bill passed but is now stuck in the 3rd U.S. Court of Appeals after being ruled unconstitutional - and the \$11.2 million it raised for sexual-assault survivor programs and indigent health care is locked in state coffers until the case is settled. So on March 2, Cohen filed HB 2070, making several changes including dropping the surcharge to \$3, but fellow Houston Dem Rep. Senfronia Thompson had already filed HB 982, levying a flat 10% tax on admission fees. Cohen's proposal sends the surcharge revenue to the sexual-assault program fund, while Thompson's bill splits the tax revenue between that fund, the foundation school fund, and general revenue projects.

Cohen's chief of staff, Bill Kelly, called HB 2070 less a replacement and more "a reform bill." But Brete Anderson, Thompson's legislative director, said that while Cohen's proposal fixed several problems, it did not solve a fundamental stumbling block. "It's an

unconstitutional tax on expression," he said. He noted that Thompson's tax is modeled on similar laws in 10 other states, all considered constitutional.

So what about the money for victim support? Kelly called HB 2070 "the best chance for providing the revenue for statewide survivor programs." Anderson countered that his office is still waiting on revenue estimates for HB 982 from the comptroller's staff. They're cautious after calculating that the \$5 surcharge would raise \$87 million in the first biennium, when it is on track to raise only \$19 million. Working on new data on sexually oriented businesses from a University of Texas study, Kelly said he's confident in new estimates that the \$3 surcharge will produce \$18 million a year.

However, while HB 1751 is still in court and may remain there for years, Anderson said he doesn't expect any opposition from sexually oriented businesses for Thompson's bill, because it would not affect the cover-free lunchtime trade and gives the businesses a tax credit on fees already paid under HB 1751. While he applauded Cohen's intentions, with Thompson's bill, he said, "we can start getting money to people who need help now, rather than waiting 3½ years for a bill to go through the courts." — Richard Whittaker

GETTING WITH THE PROGRAM

House Bill 873 - the latest push by Rep. Dawnna Dukes, D-Austin, to reform the **Texas Moving Image Industry Incentive Program** – is steaming through the Lege with near-universal support. The proposal isn't an arts subsidy, Dukes explains. Instead, it's a sensible way to secure an existing industry that's taking a pummeling.

Incentives have become the norm for states competing to attract film production, but Texas isn't competitive. Nationwide, Dukes told the March 4 meeting of the House Culture, Recreation & Tourism Committee, the median tax credit among other state programs is 25%. Texas only currently offers a capped 5% cash rebate on the budget of qualifying TV, film, commercial, and video-game productions. What's on the table not only increases the total amount available to the program (Gov. Rick Perry wants to boost it from \$22 million last session to \$60 million for the next biennium) but also increases the number and type of productions eligible. As well as reaching out to independent and straight-to-DVD productions, Dukes said, "We would be able to increase the potential for more episodic television [shows], which are long-term projects." Another Friday Night Lights moving to Texas could mean years of stable jobs, plus the potential for tourism. Take the old TV show Dallas. "People wanted to see Southfork, and it's this itty-bitty place in Parker," she said.

The bill's biggest structural change gives the Texas Film Commission more authority and latitude over payouts. That bucks the current trend of legislators fighting to restrain the power of appointed commissioners. Dukes argues that the current rules leave commission Director Bob Hudgins with far less rulemaking authority than his counterparts at other agencies. Hudgins said the new proposals address "the dire need for flexibility" when it came to tooling rebates to the exact needs of individual productions, while still getting their tax dollars into Texas and enforcing accountability on his office. "There will still be rules; there will still be supervision," he assured those fearful of another rogue agency.

The market in incentives is getting tougher. Louisiana, Massachusetts, and New York have all upped their programs in recent months, while on Feb. 20, California (which

has never suffered for production) introduced tax credits. The right incentives attract producers: In 2002, the last year before New Mexico introduced incentives, that state had only \$8 million in film production. In 2006, that number had jumped to \$400 million. Dukes could even point to individual productions that Texas has lost. The upcoming Roller Derby movie Whip It!, based on a novel set in Austin, "is now being filmed in, of all places, Michigan, where incentives are much higher than in the Lone Star State," she noted.

Out of the roughly 80 witnesses at the March 4 meeting, only one - Michael Sullivan, president of arch-conservative Texans for Fiscal Responsibility - spoke against the proposal. The rest - including motion picture industry and union representatives, the Texas Hotel Association, and film professionals such as director Richard Linklater and animal wrangler Gil Dean were all in favor.

The good news. Hudgins told the committee, is that the current incentives have attracted commercial and video-game production - mainly because no other state incentivizes them. HB 873 gives them a bigger boost and opens up the program to educational and instructional videos - like commercials, not as glamorous as big-budget movies, but an untapped market that could keep production crews busy and soundstages booked.

Attracting productions, Dukes said, is really about protecting the Texas film industry's permanent infrastructure and skills base. Both are under threat: Rebecca Campbell, union picture, and the blue-collar workers "There aren't too many industries out there - Richard Whittaker



Needle Exchange Clears Committee

Greenville GOP Sen. Robert Deuell's bid to let local health departments establish anonymous hypo-needle-exchange programs (Senate Bill 188) made it out of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee with just two votes against it. The measure is intended as a harm-reduction and communicable-disease-control program. Simply put, giving addicts clean needles cuts down on the spread of diseases like HIV and hepatitis; the program would also be an access point for drug treatment and disease screening and counseling. Texas is the only state that does not allow some form of needle exchange.

Voting against the measure was Sen. Dan Patrick, R-Houston, and newbie Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, who took over the District 17 seat vacated by Sen, Kyle Janek. (In 2007, Janek, as a member of the committee and as a member of the whole Senate, voted in favor of needle exchange.) Despite the two naysayers, the bill, which the Department of State Health Services says could prevent as many as 100 new HIV cases each year (which in turn could save the state millions – treating the uninsured for HIV costs the state roughly \$385,000 per person), the measure will now move to the entire body for consideration.



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Doggett Refutes McCaul Op-Ed

The battle over the Obama **stimulus** package rages on, now down at the state level. But before it could get there, of course, it had to get through Congress. The split on the bill was Democrats vs. Republicans, and that was reflected in the Austin delegation.

District 10's Michael McCaul, in an op-ed published in both the Austin American-Statesman and Houston Chronicle, assailed the bill as a "Trojan horse for billions of dollars in pork-barrel spending" and "one giant earmark." District 25's Lloyd Doggett, on the other hand, told us last week that he viewed the bill as an "imperfect but responsible response" to our nation's troubled economy and refuted some of the McCaul op-ed's main points.

While McCaul has insisted that the GOP had "an alternative plan that I supported, but to which the Democrats gave little consideration," Doggett counters that "their only alternatives, really, are more of the same failed policies of the last eight years."

"One has to look at: What are the benefits?" Doggett said. "What does this mean in Central Texas? ... What is it that they were voting against? Well, I begin with what I put into it personally that wasn't in there originally: a highereducation tax credit. There is not a family living within the boundaries of Austin Community College that cannot, in each of the next two years, get all of their tuition and textbooks paid for to go to ACC. ... If your family makes less than \$160,000, you're going to get \$2,500, which will cover the tuition and textbooks and instructional materials. The same holds true applying to someone going to UT or Texas State or somewhere else; it's just that we don't cover all of it."


Doggett also took a swipe at McCaul's environmental creds - the Republican has made much of sponsoring legislation promoting green schools but overall gets poor marks from enviro groups. "I notice that various Republican members like to claim that they are for various forms of green energy. They may not be for the environment, but they are for environmental technology. A central part of this package ... is focusing on green job creation, recognizing especially that in Central Texas, whether it's that battery consortium that they're trying to get, whether it's plug-in hybrid vehicles ... there is a tremendous amount of money that flows directly and indirectly ... that is there to stimulate a move toward a carbon-free economy."

A key point to the editorial: McCaul's claim that "The nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office says that, long-term, the stimulus will do more harm than good."

"The CBO said if we have this much debt added, over the long run, it will have the tendency to crowd out private capital and have a negative effect," Doggett replied. "What is not pointed out is that they said, over the short run, that it will increase growth and increase employment. In other words, it will help us get out of the mess Republicans have gotten us in, but over the long run, we've got to face the deficits being created and inherited from the Bush administration."

SCHOOL BILL PUT TO THE TEST

Another legislative session means another public school omnibus bill. Legislators were presented with the mammoth 128-page bill (filed as House Bill 3 by House Public Education Chair Rob Eissler, R-The Woodlands, and Senate Bill 3 by Senate Education Chair Florence Shapiro, R-Plano) when it was filed on March 5. The big question is whether it includes significant changes to the strict rules on school repurposing and the perennial bugbear of teaching to the test.

As introduced, schools and districts will no longer be measured solely by their Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills scores, Shapiro said. Instead, there will be two new standards: college readiness, gauged by end-of-course English and algebra tests, and skilled work force readiness, which uses the same tests but will also be compared against similar programs in technical and community colleges. Texas Education Commissioner Robert Scott praised the proposal for bringing the state, federal, and financial accountability standards into "one overall measurement." As for schools that do not meet the new standards, "academically unacceptable" has been switched to the softer-sounding "academically insufficient." But as introduced, there's little change in the punitive process of school interventions and repurposing.

Linda Bridges, president of the Texas affiliate of the American Federation of Teachers, said she backs

Shapiro's proclaimed intention of ditching the current "gotcha" accountability system, but this bill doesn't do that. As it stands, she said, HB 3 does "little to fix the key flaw in the current accountability system - the extreme emphasis placed on standardized test scores as the measure of progress for students and schools."

There are rival accountability bills under consideration that would end the five-year deadline for mandatory repurposing. HB 771 by Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, would declare a moratorium on all sanctions until after the state-appointed Campus Intervention Team has undertaken a full study and written a plan for each low-performing campus. Similarly, HB 1238 by Rep. Dawnna Dukes, D-Austin, would end compulsory closures and instead use consultation between the Texas Education Agency, the district, the school, and the surrounding community to turn the campus around. Dukes, a graduate of Reagan High School and Pearce Middle School (both of which face mandatory repurposing in the next two years) said: "The agency constantly said, 'Well our hands are tied.' We'll untie them." As for HB 3, she expects a serious rewrite in committee. "When it comes to the floor of the Legislature, it will be loaded up like a Christmas tree with lights," she said. Richard Whittaker

NURSE RATIOS STIR DEBATE

The National Nurses Organizing Committee has landed sponsors for its legislation to mandate minimum nurseto-patient ratios in Texas hospitals. Last week, Rep. Senfronia Thompson and Sen. Mario Gallegos, both of Houston, filed the Texas Hospital Patient Protection Act (Hosue Bill 1489/Senate Bill 1000). Thompson said she decided to sign on with the bill after her granddaughter went to Huntsville Memorial Hospital with a 104.6-degree temperature, waited more than four hours, and ultimately left untreated. "Those nurses were so overburdened with people coming into the ER, and here's a child almost having seizures," Thompson said. Gallegos said he was motivated by his brush with death after a liver transplant last year.

The NNOC also took a swipe at Austin Rep. Donna Howard's HB 591, which would elevate the role of nurses in staffing decisions but not mandate ratios, saying in a press release, "The **Texas Hospital Association** has proposed legislation to block safe RN-to-patient ratios." Replied Howard: "The NNOC's statement is not accurate." Noting that the NNOC urged the Senate Health and Human Services Committee to add language it believed would strengthen HB 591, Howard said the political reality is her bill may be too strong for the business-loving Lege - instead of adopting the NNOC's language, the committee discussed removing whistle-blower protections. - L.N.

Carstarphen on Tour Reagan High

For a second weekend, Meria Carstarphen, the sole finalist to become Austin Independent School District superintendent. met Austinites Saturday in the Reagan High School cafeteria, as part of her 21-day public vetting process. Before an audience of about a hundred mostly white and African-American parents, as well as teachers and district employees, Carstarphen summarized her background and laid out her philosophy for the job.

While she's proud of the magnet schools and innovative programs she introduced as superintendent in St. Paul, Minn., on this day Carstarphen emphasized fundamentals. Are kids in kindergarten through third grade getting the basic learning and comprehension skills they need to move on to higher grades, and are high schoolers really college- and career-ready? She stressed she'll protect what works and remove any proven failures, even if it upsets some stakeholders. That includes her own staff: While educators should be "the most beloved people in the community," she said, "we cannot protect failing teachers."

Her primary intention, she said, is to ensure that when big decisions are made, they are made with transparency. That way, even if stakeholders don't agree with a policy, at least they understand it. "Telling a more complete picture [about a school] is more important than how you tell it," she said.

The district board of trustees will make its formal decision on Carstarphen at its March 23 meeting. Offstage, board President Mark Williams said that while the board didn't recruit Carstarphen to fix one overwhelming problem ("Education

isn't an either/or business," he noted), accountability is the core education issue in Texas. While in Minnesota, Carstarphen said, she had to "reconstitute, restructure, or close" 10 schools. With Reagan as well as Pearce Middle School facing statemandated repurposing, that experience could be vital, and it was clear that this mostly East Austin crowd wants her to do whatever she can to prevent the closing of neighborhood schools. When one speaker asked her what the community can do to help, Carstarphen answered: "Give me a little time. ... And come together as a community ... so we can work for all the babies, all of the time."

In some ways, St. Paul is a lot like Austin, Williams added. Coming from another state capital means Carstarphen is used to dealing with legislators. She's worked in a multiethnic district with many students with limited English language proficiency, and while a majority of AISD's students are Hispanic, Williams noted, "at Lanier [High School], there's over 50 languages spoken." Both districts have limited finances, and Carstarphen has overseen a \$10 million budget shortfall in St. Paul. (But St. Paul has a \$628 million budget for 38,000 students, while AISD has \$972 million for 82,000.)

More importantly, Williams said, Carstarphen understands that public education is only one option for families. While St. Paul has seen declining enrollments districtwide, AISD's overall rising student numbers disguise localized pockets of decline. The big challenge for Carstarphen and the board, Williams said, is: "How do we give our kids options and choices within the public - Richard Whittaker school system?"

WALKING ON THE WATER BY WELLS DUNBAR

One man's trash is another man's treasure - or more accurately, one's scenic boardwalk is another's "elevated concrete human highway." So to the delight of the mayor and the anger of some lakefront property owners, the City Council approved a preliminary path for the Lady Bird Lake boardwalk last week. To fill a mile-plus gap in the lake trail system - starting west of the freeway and heading to Lakeshore Park east of I-35 - the path runs over land and water, spilling into the lake by the Riverwalk and Waterfront condo complexes along Riverside Drive where some residents are unhappy with the plan. A press conference that morning calling to approve the project – where Hizzoner Will Wynn himself stood with trail advocates - signaled the city's official support.

That didn't stop several boardwalk opponents from speaking that morning against the lake view obstructionin-waiting. Fred Schmidt registered his displeasure by literally screaming "Wake up, Austin!" then questioning the environmental impact of the aforementioned "human highway" and "bicycle superroadway." Assistant Parks Director Stuart Strong defended the size of the boardwalk - 14 feet across, 6 feet above the water, and potentially 30 feet out from the shore - to the Chronicle by noting that its width is a national standard for multiuse trails, a requirement should the potentially \$15 million project hope to receive federal dollars. Plus, says Strong, "If we built one that is too narrow, we'd get the opposite criticism."

As approved Thursday, City Council only set the boardwalk's path; further refinements and design decisions will be brought before the Parks and Recreation Board, Says Strong, "It will probably be in April before we get something to look at." Here's a proposal: As long as we're building a boardwalk, what's stopping a Coney Islandgone-Austin ideation, with veggie-hot-dog vendors and solar-powered carnival booths where you shoot recycled lake water into an eco-friendly plastic clown's mouth?

Let the Sun Shine In

Speaking of solar energy, Austin Energy's proposed 30-megawatt solar array also passed unanimously last week. The central question was how to shoulder the annual \$10 million bill: whether to spread the tab among all AE ratepayers (adding about 60 cents to the average household's monthly bill) or offer the solar energy as part of AE's **GreenChoice** program, under which customers pay a premium for renewables (but could ultimately save, as the rate remains fixed over time). AE

General Manager Roger Duncan announced it would be the latter in a March 2 memo, saying the utility would offer solar-only packages along with batches of blended renewables.

That still leaves solar relatively expensive - around 17 cents per kilowatt hour, according to enviro-energy maven and cantankerous council watcher Paul Robbins. However, compared to the cost of a new natural gas plant, plus a likely-to-be-determined federal carbon tax, Robbins found the cost comparable. The city also made an agreement with solar-farmers Gemini Solar **Development Co.** that any federal investment tax credits or incentives be passed through to AE to help buy down the cost of the batch.

However, Robbins also touched on the elephant in the chamber: worries that heavy energy users, such as chip-

makers Freescale and Spansion (whose rates are

already subsidized), would undermine additional renewable efforts. "There is a proposal, and it's really a rumor at this point ... that there's going to be some kind of possible stakeholders process or task force." Robbins said. "If the council feels the need for some kind of new process. I would ask that the large industrials of course be given access to it, but not be given veto power." And wouldn't you know, the project passed along with a provi-

sion creating a "stakeholder process" examining renewable energy. However, motion-maker Lee Leffingwell said, the board should be "diverse, representative of all sides, and not weighing in favor of any particular interest."

Free Association

The wonk's highlight last week was the presentation on ways to improve the council agenda process. The commonsense ideas presented: bringing back the precouncil work sessions and handling controversial zoning cases there, splitting meetings into morning and evening sessions, and simplifying posting language... This week, an ordinance prohibiting incentives for retail projects (Item 5: Call it "Domain Reprise") returns, having been pulled two weeks back to double-check the legal language... New permitting regulations for live-music venues (Item 17) come before council as the Live Music Task Force members continue their détente with neighborhoods... Seemingly spurred by the Rescue Austin **Memorial Park/Austin Memorial Park Cemetery** controversy, a new regulation would prohibit using city cemeteries as construction sites (Item 18).

Maybe new music clubs can open there instead.

It's All About the Process

Does anyone in Austin think a nationally respected planning firm can teach Austin a thing or two about inclusive public processes that work?

City Council has pushed back to April 23 its selection of a comprehensive planning consultant due to an outcry from some Austinites who want more input now. On March 4, three council members - Laura Morrison, Randi Shade, and Lee Leffingwell – fielded comments from Austinites. They suggested questions for council to submit to the three finalist teams, led by ACP Visioning +Planning, HNTB, and Wallace Roberts & Todd, City staff covered the city's process to date. Leffingwell commented that it was important for communitywide comprehensive planning to get off on the right foot – and that it seemed the city hadn't done a very good job of that so far.

The biggest issue of concern was process. Specifically, how exactly will the community be engaged and included? **Tim Mahoney**, who advocates using representatives from five sectors of the city, asked for council to create a task force to vet the process. Mark Yznaga, representing Liveable City, submitted a list of nine questions for the consultant team and 10 for the city. ("Why didn't the city convene a community advisory committee before the consultant was chosen, as was done for the **Envision Central Texas** planning effort?") Much suspicion seemed directed toward local subconsultants - and their existing local ties and loyalties - and toward the city itself, rather than at the consulting firms.

Next steps: Council will cull a final list of questions and submit it to the finalists. Their answers will be publicly available March 27. A second public forum is set for April 7. (For more information: www.cityofaustin.org/ planning/comp_plan.htm.) Katherine Gregor

Hard Bargaining at KLRU

Erratic schedules and workdays that can stretch up to 18 hours are not uncommon for the camera operators, editors, and other behind-thescenes magic-makers who give KLRU shows such as Austin City Limits their renowned high production values. According to Mike Gross, vice president of the Texas State Employees Union of the Communication Workers of America, that's why production and engineering employees at the local PBS affiliate have been afforded contractual provisions for 25 years, protecting them from some of the worst vagaries common to their line of work. But now, says Gross, the station wants to eliminate those provisions.


KLRU renegotiates its contract with TSEU Local 6186 every three years, and the latest round began last September. While the process usually wraps up within a couple of months. says Gross (who has negotiated two previous KLRU contracts), this time it has dragged on without resolution. At issue are contract provisions guaranteeing overtime to employees who work more than 10 hours or five days in a row or who have to return to work less than 10 hours after they've left. Also at stake is the "meal penalty," a provision that compensates employees one hour's pay for every five hours and 15 minutes they work without a meal break.



While KLRU has offered "small pay raises" in return, says Gross, they do not make up for what the employees would be losing. In a TSEU/CWA bulletin, Gross wrote, "Members feel strongly that if these protections are lost, there will be no incentive for management to insure reasonable working conditions for its employees."

KLRU CEO and General Manager **Bill Stotesbery** wouldn't provide details about the negotiations while still in the process, saying only, "These are all guys we like and respect and think the world of, and we're confident we can come to an agreement." With that in mind, the station has enlisted the help of federal mediators, who will meet with both sides today (Thursday, March 12) in hopes of finding a resolution.

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Adding Insult to Brain Injury

The American taxpayers officially fired Dr. **Robert Van Boven** on his birthday, Jan. 27. The former director of the **Brain Imaging and Recovering Laboratory** in Austin has taken temporary work at an Illinois hospital, flying home once a month to visit his wife and 7-year-old daughter. The lab, which is currently inactive, was run by the Veterans Administration's Central Texas Veterans Health Care System, based in Temple.

Van Boven says he was fired for disclosing fraud, waste, and mismanagement at the Central Texas system. Retaliating against whistle-blowers who expose wrongdoing at federal agencies violates federal law. The Office of Special Counsel, the federal agency charged with protecting whistle-blowers against reprisals, is currently investigating Van Boven's case.

On March 5, Van Boven endured yet another blow when he discovered that the VA had reported his termination to the **National Practitioner Data Bank**, an information clearinghouse created by Congress in 1986. Its purpose is to identify incompetent doctors and other health-care providers and restrict them from moving state to state without disclosing their malpractice history. The report states that Van Boven was terminated for "unprofessional conduct" – a sweeping phrase that calls into question his competence as a physician. However, according to the VA's own documents, he was fired as an administrator and not as a physician.

The report, Van Boven says, makes it nearly impossible for him to seek permanent employment. "It's the kiss of death," he says. "The National Practitioner Data [Bank] is the 'bad doctor list'; if you're being reported, good luck getting a license, keeping a license, or getting a job anywhere."

"They dug me out of the grave and then struck me up from a tree so the ravens can pluck my eyes out," he adds.

The VA would not discuss Van Boven's case. But in an e-mail to the *Chronicle*, VA regional public affairs officer Diana Struski confirms that "if a clinical provider has other

than clinical personnel action, they are not reportable to the National Practitioner Data Base." Van Boven, a neurologist, worked as a clinician at the lab in addition to his administrative duties. However, according to the Central Texas VA's own documents, his firing was related to his performance as an administrator and had nothing to do with patient care. In a November 2008 proficiency report - his only job evaluation at the VA -Van Boven scored an overall "satisfactory" and a "high satisfactory" in "clinical competence." Moreover, in a Sept. 10, 2008, memo, a VA review board charged with investigating complaints against Van Boven states that the "inappropriate conduct and behavior" of which

he was being accused "are not associated with professional conduct or competence." And his clinical supervisor, Dr. Abraham Delgado, wrote Van Boven a positive letter of reference in September.

Meanwhile, the Brain Imaging Lab may be in for its own kiss of death. As first reported by the *Chronicle* on Dec. 12, 2008, the lab could be permanently shuttered. A committee of VA officials has written a recommendation and sent it to Dr. **Michael Kussman**, the VA's undersecretary for health in Washington, D.C, who will decide what to do with the BIRL and its funding. The VA would not release the committee's recommendation or offer an expected date for Kussman's decision.

The BIRL opened in the **J.J. Pickle Research Campus** in 2007 to research and develop treatment for combat-related traumatic brain injury, the "signature injury" of the war in Iraq. The possibility of the lab closing has reaped protest from veterans groups and public



lost at Emmis property *Texas Monthly*, according to the publication's president, Evan Smith. Pickering's departure represents yet another blow to the news-gathering capabilities of KLBJ, one of the few remaining news radio stations in the state.

officials. Sen. **John Cornyn** and U.S. Reps. **Lloyd Doggett, Mike McCaul, Lamar Smith**, and **John Carter** wrote letters to then-Secretary of Veterans Affairs **James Peake** in December expressing opposition to the closing.

A report released this month by the **Congressional Brain Injury Task Force** reinvigorated the call to save the BIRL. The report concludes that 320,000 U.S. soldiers returning from Iraq and Afghanistan suffer from traumatic brain injury, usually the result of blasts from explosives.

"We must devote as much attention and as many resources as possible to help returning soldiers with the invisible wounds of war – mental health conditions like Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, Traumatic Brain Injury, depression, and anxiety," Cornyn says. "The efforts of facilities like the Veterans Brain Imaging and Recovery Lab in Austin and other treatment centers across the country are critical to this effort."

Van Boven's woes began shortly after he was hired to run the BIRL in 2007. Van Boven asserted that a research project being conducted with the BIRL's brain scanner was not in keeping with the BIRL's mission and that a contractor working on the project was padding his time sheet. Overall, he estimated that \$1.2 million in taxpayer money has been wasted on the project.

Instead of investigating Van Boven's claims, his supervisors in Temple – including **Bruce Gordon**, then-director of the Central Texas system; chief of staff **Edward Sherwood**; and associate chief of staff for research Dr. **Paul Hicks** – refused to take action. Van Boven went over their heads and called in VA investigators. Two reports issued after internal investigations – a July 29 report by the VA Office of Inspector General and a Dec. 23 report by the VA Office of Research Oversight – substantiated many of his allegations.

In the wake of Van Boven's complaints, his bosses at the Central Texas system found

cause to investigate him. (It should be noted that Van Boven doesn't make it easy to like him. His kinetic personality often comes across as abrasive, and he drives his points home with frequent, aggressive communications.) Van Boven says the charges against him were meant to punish him for blowing the whistle on his bosses. They included:

- Insubordination for defying orders to refrain from organizing a fun run to benefit traumatic brain injury research. A VA regional counsel opined that Van Boven was free to organize the event as a private citizen.
- The use of profanity and "threatening gestures" at work. Van Boven admits he occasionally used profanity at work but says it was never directed toward a person. He denies making threatening gestures.
- "Disrespecting" Cornyn at a BIRL event attended by the senator. The VA alleges Van Boven inconvenienced the senator by letting the event run long in order to allow two injured veterans to speak. Cornyn's office wrote a letter denying that Cornyn felt disrespected.

Van Boven was fired in November for "unprofessional conduct." The VA agreed to an Office of Special Counsel request for a 60-day termination stay while the agency conducted its investigation. The stay ended Jan. 27. A second request from the office for a stay was denied by the VA. The office has yet to complete its investigation, but given the agency's dismal record – only about 1% of its cases in 2007 were remedied – Van Boven has little hope that he'll be vindicated. Meanwhile, he's fighting for his career.

"I've got a patient dying of encephalitis in the ICU right now, and I'm supposed to put all my focus and all my might into saving her life, and at the same time I'm putting all this energy into fighting these bastards to salvage my reputation and my career," Van Boven says, his voice cracking over the phone. "Then I go home and sleep in a frickin' hotel room."

WORDS FOR WALL STREET GREED

Wow, y'all are prolific. And good. I recently ran a little contest asking readers to come up with some new words to describe the abominable sense of self-entitlement that afflicts Wall Street bankers. I noted that such common pejoratives as "greedy" and "shameful" just don't cover the astonishing arrogance presently being flashed at us by the royal princes of high finance, so I sought your creativity for devising more appropriate terms.

You sent in a gusher of words, phrases – and lots of attitude. Quite a few offerings referred to body parts and bodily functions, usually involving four-letter words that are unusable here. On the other hand, some submissions were deceptively sweet, such as "piggy poos," which really does have sort of a nursery-rhyme sting to it.

Among the newly coined expressions were these jewels: "banksters," which beautifully captures the mobster aspect of the greed; "greasels," which combines greed and weasel; "leechengrubbers," which is described as bankers who suck the life out of us then turn around and beg us for bailouts; and "megalomoneyacs," which goes to the psychopathic aspect of those sorry souls.

Some readers chose action words to apply to the bankers, such as "criminal," "treasonous," and, "You're fired." Others needed lengthy phrases to capture their full fury, including these two: "unbridled bastards of mass deception" and "amoral rapacious financial terrorists." And one needed another language, Spanish, to nail the bankers, choosing "lacras," a deeply insulting term meaning that the Wall Streeters are low-life scum, unrepentant moochers trying to take everything for themselves.

Then there's one fellow who thought words were not enough: "I say just hang these scums."

Last week, Jim Hightower donated his personal archives to the Wittliff Collections at Texas State University-San Marcos. CORPORATIST COURT FAVORS MOUNTAINTOP DESTRUCTION

Once again, the black-robed corporatists of the federal courts have shown their true bias by ruling in favor of corporate power over common sense and the common good.

This time, the dirty deed was done by circuit court judges in Virginia (a group notoriously sycophantish to corporate interests). In a ruling long sought by the coal barons of Appalachia, a three-judge panel recently decided that the companies can proceed with a brutally destructive mining process that the industry euphemistically calls "mountaintop removal."


It works like this: To get at coal seams, companies explode the top third of beautiful, forest-covered Appalachian mountains; then they "remove" the rubble, not by taking it somewhere but by merrily bulldozing it down the sides of the decapitated mountain, burying the valleys, streams, wildlife, and everything else below.

Some 1,200 miles of streams have already been destroyed, and downstream drinking-water supplies have been contaminated. So, local advocates for the communities and environment went to court on the grounds that this is a rather obvious violation of the Clean Water Act. No, said the judges, refusing to compel King Coal to avoid burying streams or even to conduct thorough environmental reviews before exploding a mountain.

Luckily, these judges need not have the final say in deciding the fate of Appalachia's mountains, streams, and people. The Environmental Protection Agency – which literally was run by industry executives, lobbyists, and apologists during George W.'s regime – is under new management and can restore the protections that the Bushites gutted. In addition, Congress can and should rewrite the law to stop this madness once and for all.

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The Downtown skyline of any city is its most public face, emblematic of its prosperity, status, growth, and change.

In that context, Austin's new urban skyline – much like Lady Bird Lake or Zilker Park – belongs to the whole community. No matter which neighborhood or exurb people reside in, they notice and feel invested in the changes Downtown – most recently, the rising new residential towers. And because they're so prominent, the high-rises stir curiosity and strong emotions – ranging from excitement, dismay, and skepticism to lifestyle lust. As the most visible symbols of an evolving, prosperous Austin and Downtown, they're emotional lightning rods that intrigue newcomers and simultaneously alarm much of the old guard.

Now, with the national economy and the housing markets in financial meltdown, Austinites are wondering about the luxury-condo and apartment-tower boom. Is it over? Is the densification of Downtown, as one remedy to suburban sprawl, on hold? Or is 2009 the ideal year to find a bargain and join the trend? While Austin's real estate market has weathered the recession better than those of many other cities, many wonder about the demand for all the luxury units under construction.

To get a sense of the current market dynamics, we talked to local representatives of the development teams behind major condo projects Downtown.

Taylor Andrews co-developed the 360 Condominiums, the virtually sold-out Novare-Andrews Urban tower that opened at 44 stories in 2008. (The team plans a similar tower, Ovation, and a mixed-use project with condos on Block 52, the site of the relocating Downtown post office.) The other developers interviewed represent the "big four" towers now under construction and scheduled to open by the end of 2010. They are Spring (Larry Warshaw and Perry Lorenz, Spring Austin Partners Ltd.), the Austonian (Terry Mitchell, a consultant to Benchmark Development, the Austin-based subsidiary of Spanish developer Grupo Villar Mir), W Austin Hotel & Residences (Beau Armstrong and Laurie Swan. Stratus Properties), and the Four Seasons Residences (Brett Denton and Art Carpenter with Ardent Residential). Each of these buildings has a distinct submarket, geographically and demographically. Sharing insights from a broker's perspective was Kevin Burns, CEO of UrbanSpace, which specializes in selling Downtown Austin residences, while other sources involved in the market contributed their perspectives, as well.

Skyline, revisited: This 2007 composite image from *Austin Fit Magazine* showed what Downtown would look like if all the high-rise projects then announced were built. (We ran it in our Oct. 5, 2007, issue.) For our 2009 status update: Buildings shown in gray are under construction; buildings that are white have been put on hold.

This particular dialogue with the developers focused specifically on the high-rise condo market and only on projects Downtown. Skyline watchers also will have spotted three new apartment towers that opened in 2008: AMLI on 2nd, the Monarch, and the Legacy on the Lake. The 18-story AMLI on 2nd opened with 231 units in December 2007 and is now 92% occupied. Open in May 2008, the 305-unit, 29-story Monarch reports being more than 70% occupied and 80% leased. Opened in October after the economic meltdown started, the 187-unit, 31-story **Legacy on the Lake** is only about 20% occupied. (It has been discounting units 18%: the smallest 653-square-foot one-bedroom leases for just under \$1,200.) Now rising near City Hall is the 36-story **Ashton**; its large, upscale 258 units will open this summer. These rental options house a middleincome range of Downtown residents; a number of prospective condo buyers first try renting, to be sure they groove on high-rise life. Some market observers warn of an excess

of new high-end apartments, with about 3,000 units now open or planned in and around Downtown.

The condo developers with projects still rising are the savvy, well-capitalized, and lucky ones; about an equal number of projects were weeded out by market forces and never broke ground. Not surprisingly, the survivors remain a bullish bunch - even facing a serious recession. "The biggest misperception is that Downtown Austin is in this crisis with the rest of the nation," asserts Andrews. He points to how quickly the 360, Austin's largest Downtown high-rise ever, sold out last year - even as the national housing market went into a downward spiral. The projects are also filling their ground-floor retail spaces. The 360's are leased to locally opened cafes, the soon-to-open Garrido's restaurant, an art gallery, and a Blue Star grocery; one 13,000-plus-squarefoot space now is for sale for close to \$5 million. "We're coming off a really great year that has demonstrated demand beyond what anyone thought would be the case," said Andrews. "It's a testament to what a great city Austin is. We should consider ourselves very fortunate."

PONDERING DOWNTOWN CONDOS FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

ISN'T THE AUSTIN CONDO MARKET OVERBUILT?

The "O" word irritates all of the developers interviewed, Realtors as well. All insist, "No, we are not 'overbuilt'!" Their key argument: After the four high-rise condo projects now under construction sell out, no other projects are in the pipeline. Due to the meltdown of the economy, which has frozen the capital markets and project financing, developers believe we're unlikely to see any new projects financed for one to two years. (Taylor Andrews is the exception; he's bullish on starting construction on his Ovation tower, much like the 360 and with similar "attainable" pricing, in early 2010.)

The lag in project starts could in fact lead to a shortage of units by 2012 or so. Burns said his market stats for Downtown show that 776 new condominium units were completed and available in 2008. Of those, 670 have sold, with a "net absorption" of more than 600 units in one year. Now about 790 more condominiums are under construction; about 350 of those are under contract. That leaves just 546 units to be sold – over three to four years, as little or no new product is coming on the market through 2012 or 2013.

WHO'S BUYING ALL THESE CONDOS? IS THERE MUCH DIVERSITY?

A good number of Austin's new Downtown residents have previously lived in the heart of other cities and liked it. "We have a broad spectrum of buyers," said Beau Armstrong of the W Austin Hotel & Residences. "They tend to be progressive thinkers that embrace the idea of urban living." Broker Kevin Burns agreed, based on his client base: "Downtown is one of the most diverse neighborhoods in Austin. The residents make up a wide variety of ages, cultural and social backgrounds, and family types."

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WHAT'S WITH ALL THE EMPTY NESTERS?

Once the kids leave home, Larry Warshaw observed, "by moving Downtown, empty nesters can move closer to the things they really love about Austin, erase traffic as a factor in their lives, lower all their utility bills, get rid of any home maintenance, and give themselves flexibility to lock their door, walk away, and travel." Émpty nesters are willing to reduce the size of their homes – sometimes radically - if it means they can also reduce the hours drained by home and yard chores and commuting.

ARE FAMILIES MOVING DOWNTOWN?

According to the developers questioned, about 5% of condos under construction are likely to house families with children. But that's expected to increase, especially if the next development cycle can produce more attainably priced homes with several bedrooms. "Many younger professionals are choosing Downtown living as a desirable alternative," said Art Carpenter. "As these families enter child-rearing years, the dynamics of Downtown life in Austin may shift to be similar to other cities on the coasts, such as New York, San Francisco, and Boston - transforming Austin into a livable Downtown for all family demographics. This should be a natural evolution for Downtown Austin as it reaches maturity."

ARE AUSTINITES BUYING THESE CONDOS OR MOSTLY INVESTORS OR OUT-OF-TOWNERS?

Today, most buyers are Austinites, and nearly all plan to live in their units. That's a change from the market through 2007 and early 2008. Presales to investors and speculative flippers tended to be the ones that fell out; the replacement buyers intend to be real residents (some part-time). Burns said: "Approximately 90 percent of the deals that UrbanSpace has done in the past year have

been sold to owner-occupants. About half ... have sold to locals, the other half to people moving into Austin." Other developers cite similar percentages.

WHAT ABOUT THE CONDO PROJECTS **PUT ON HOLD OR CANCELED?**

Based on a fairly comprehensive list of projects (see "Condos," p.29), high-rises totaling about 1,400 units moved forward, while another 1,400 units have been canceled or indefinitely postponed. Even in the best of times, some projects announced are always ill-fated, ill-conceived, undercapitalized, or just unattractive to lenders and presale shoppers – and thus remain unbuilt.

By summer 2008 in Austin, as credit markets ran dry, project financing had already become scarce. Then the capital markets succumbed fully to the widening financial crisis. Some projects look strong to restart once construction loans become available again. With no new projects now starting, some local architecture and engineering firms face the grim reality of massive layoffs or firm closure. However, with half the condo supply eliminated and demand still strong, there's broad confidence that all of the units now under construction will find buyers.

WERE PROJECTS CANCELED BECAUSE THERE AREN'T ENOUGH BUYERS?

Developers report that lack of construction financing, not a lack of buyers, is what delayed or killed projects. At Spring, "we are seeing 10 to 20 new, interested parties come through our presentation centers each and every week," said Warshaw in late February. "We took two contracts in the last week. ... We did about a dozen tours of the building in the last week alone. There is no question the demand is huge." Other sales offices reported that fall and January were very quiet but interest is again picking up.

What prospective buyers aren't doing as readily is signing contracts and writing checks. Market confidence is off. Those empty nesters can't sell their million-dollar Lakeway and West Lake homes in order to make the move or can't get the price they want. "The question is not whether these buyers are out there – the question is: When will they feel comfortable making the commitment?" said Warshaw. "I don't know if that is one year away, two years away, or more. The time frame relates to macroeconomic issues that are, frankly, beyond all of our control."

NOW THAT IT'S TOUGHER TO GET MORTGAGES, WILL THAT AFFECT THE CONDO MARKET?

This has been an issue but primarily on lower-end units, whose buyers typically are the least creditworthy. The 360 sold out before it was completed, but about 50 of the 430 units "fell out" of contract and had to be resold. Developer Novare has found a 10% to 20% presale fallout rate typical for all such projects nationally, even in the height of the boom - so the 360 was not unusual, and nearly 30 of the residences were quickly resold to people on a waiting list.

WHAT ECONOMIC TRIGGERS WILL MAKE **HESITATING CONDO SHOPPERS SIGN CONTRACTS AGAIN?**

"I think people have to feel like the worst is over and that Austin has escaped the worst of it," said Warshaw. Burns expects buyers to resurge "once people realize that the only product that is going to be available in the next four years is what is currently under construction."

ARE THERE REALLY ENOUGH RICH PEOPLE TO FILL LUXURY TOWERS LIKE THE AUSTONIAN?

Among ordinary Austinites, this is a huge source of skepticism. But all the developers say it's no problem. The unsold supply of condominiums in the higher price points – W, Four Seasons, and Austonian – is approximately 250 to 300 units, said several developers. "Given the time frame that these are being delivered," said Carpenter, "I'm very comfortable that we have more than enough demand to absorb the supply. In fact, if the economy begins to settle down, I would argue that we will all sell out pretty quickly. We have lots of interest; people are just nervous."

Developers report that lack of construction financing, not a lack of buyers, is what has delayed or killed some projects. Some projects look strong to restart once construction loans become available again.

Sales agents at the luxury projects – the Four Seasons, the Austonian, and the W Residences, where most units are more than \$500,000, and many are more than \$1 million - say their wellto-do buyers aren't worried about qualifying. "Our buyers tend to be well-established financially," observed Carpenter. Some don't even bother with a lender – they just write a check. Others have so much cash on hand from the sale of another home that they put a huge percentage down. Banks love that.

IN THE NEXT 12-18 MONTHS, WHERE DO YOU THINK THE BARGAINS WILL BE?

Those waiting for foreclosed units or firesale prices are likely to be disappointed. In general, the relative stability of the Austin residential market over the past decade with no extreme inflationary bubble or overbuilding - dictates against discounting deeper than about 10%. (Unless, of course, the U.S. has just begun a long-lasting economic depression.)

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

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"Buyers have more negotiating power right now than before," conceded Warshaw. "To get cash in hand, developers are willing to take price reductions. I don't think people should be expecting unrealistic windfalls." He continued, "If a project is finished, and there are a couple [of less desirable] units left, sometimes a developer will offer a steep discount simply to close out the project."

I'M WORKING-CLASS AND CAN'T AFFORD NO STINKIN' DOWNTOWN CONDO. WHY SHOULDN'T I BE HAPPY IF THEY ALL FAIL?

"It is the working class that does the hard work of actually designing and constructing these buildings and maintaining them once they are built," Warshaw observed. "During construction, over 400 people per day are working on our tower alone." Construction of the full-block W project is creating 1,000 construction jobs (about 200 workers were on site by late February); it will add 400 permanent jobs upon opening.

"I think everyone enjoys having Downtown as an exciting destination to visit and bring friends and family, and these projects help to make that happen," Warshaw added. The base of residents supports the restaurants, coffee bars, shops, and museums that we all enjoy. He also pointed to developers' self-funded participation in the Great Streets program and funding of other amenities and public spaces that make Downtown a fun place to go. "Downtown residents improve the Downtown experience for all," said Burns. "They are eyes on the street making our Downtown safe. They provide a financial base for restaurants and retail to thrive in Downtown. They drive less on MoPac and I-35, therefore reducing congestion for those that need to commute."

WHAT OTHER CITIES REALLY ARE 'OVERBUILT,' IN COMPARISON TO AUSTIN?

The most extreme examples are Miami and South Florida. A huge volume of simultaneous projects are flooding the market with some 60,000 high-rise units; some single projects have 1,500 units. Developers there have speculated on sales to second-home buyers and investors (many from outside the U.S.), not area residents.

"One project alone in downtown Miami is larger than the entire number of units being delivered in Downtown Austin over a six-year period," said Burns. By his calculations, Miami is building one condo for every 40 residents; Austin is building one new condo Downtown for every 1,022 residents. Armstrong notes that compared to Miami and Las Vegas, "Austin is a small market, and we did not attract 'investor buyers' that precipitated much of the overbuilding."

Others noted that Austin has a reputation nationally as being a pain-in-the-ass city in which to get a project done. (Thank demanding city regulations and laborious processes, environmental protections, and our activist neighborhood associations and citizens.) The city's reputation actually helped stabilize the Austin market, discouraging overbuilding and a Miami-like volume of investor-driven projects. Our relatively healthy housing market in this recession exemplifies how slow-to-moderate growth protects a city's economy more than explosive growth.

ARE THESE CONDO TOWERS PAYING THEIR FAIR SHARE OF PROPERTY TAXES?

"As Mayor [Will] Wynn points out, on average, 80% of all taxes generated Downtown go to provide services outside of Downtown, in effect subsidizing other areas of town," said Terry Mitchell. "With the density within our project [the Austonian], I would guess that much more than 80% of the taxes

generated will be used to provide city services outside of Downtown." A residential tower with 250 units costs the city far less to support - but yields the same tax base - compared to a new subdivision of 250 homes, because the infrastructure (roads, sidewalks, water pipes, garbage collection, fire stations, etc.) is already in place. Plus, many commuter subdivisions and million-dollar homes are built in areas outside the municipal taxing authority - so Austin gets no property taxes to help run the city. Luxury condo towers Downtown, by contrast, capture hefty property taxes from the well-heeled for city General Fund needs such as Public Safety, Parks, and Libraries.

Spring, when fully occupied, will generate more than \$500,000 a year of new tax revenues for the city's General Fund, said Warshaw. (For perspective, that's the amount City Manager Marc Ott had proposed saving by substantially cutting hours at every branch of the Austin Public Library.) Annually, Spring also will generate more than \$600,000 for Travis County and more than \$2 million for the Austin Independent School District. The W project is expected to produce \$50 million in tax revenue over 10 years. The Austonian's projections show it generating more than \$1 million a year in city property taxes, or close to \$22 million over 20 years. Carpenter said the Four Seasons Residences will generate at least \$2.2 million in annual tax revenues for the city, county, and AISD combined when fully

occupied. All of the high-rises will generate sales-tax revenues from their ground-floor retail spaces, as well.

High-rise development also contains city costs, in comparison to the suburban model. "If 178 families live on 1-acre lots, the city is charged with maintaining four to five miles of streets, water lines, wastewater lines, drainage

"I believe we are at the early stages of a shift from the consumptive, suburban model of housing," said Mitchell, citing the "costs of transportation, commute times, the environmental damage of low-density sprawl, the consumption of our most precious resource – water. All are creating a shift to a more urban housing pattern."

pipes," and so forth, said Mitchell, as well as city services to 200-plus acres. "The Austonian abuts 334 linear feet of streets, water and wastewater pipes, and drainage pipes and consumes less than an acre of land.

COULD HIGH-RISE LIVING IN AUSTIN JUST BE A SHORT-LIVED FAD?

All the developers interviewed scoffed at the notion. "Downtown Austin is a very rare and special urban area," said Armstrong. "Amenities, amenities, amenities! I believe that the trend to Downtown living will accelerate; families are structured differently now, and the house in the suburbs does not appeal to everyone now." Whatever the challenges and headaches of getting a project done Downtown, noted the Stratus principal, it sure beats trying to develop over the Edwards Aquifer.

WILL NEW DOWNTOWN RESIDENTS TRULY DRIVE LESS, WALK MORE, AND LOWER AUSTIN'S CARBON FOOTPRINT?


Dense high-rise living in the urban core is the most sustainable city model. The whole idea, as Armstrong puts it, is that "people can park their cars and walk to shops, restaurants, work, and all the great amenities we have Downtown." Several 360 residents interviewed for this article said that they're driving even less than they'd anticipated; they now are considering selling their cars and signing on with Austin CarShare.

"Some buyers work Downtown and have told us that they intend to walk to work," said Mitchell. "Some buyers do not work, but the bulk of their activities - social, charitable, and philanthropic - are Downtown." In both groups, "one of the major reasons they are moving Downtown is to be able to walk and not use the car. In an urban lifestyle, you might get up, walk to your favorite coffee shop - there are about five in the neighborhood - to get a cup of coffee, and then walk to work. Less time. Less pollution. More exercise. Less traffic congestion."

"Our 178 families will be using zero water for irrigation," added Mitchell. He said homeowners on a 1-acre lot, on average, use around 200,000 gallons a year for that purpose. So if the Austonian replaces a luxury suburban development with 178 large-lot homes, theoretically it could save up to 35.6 million gallons of water a year.

Projects currently under construction are all utilizing green-building practices, with the W and the Austonian the most stringent. The buildings will use substantially less energy than average to heat and cool their homes. That could have an even greater impact on Austin's carbon footprint than residents' behavior. "One of the strongest selling points of our project [the W Residences] is that it will be a [Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design]-certified project," said Armstrong. "Our buyers tend to be very aware of the environment and embrace the idea of living a little lighter on the planet."










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Crazy at the Flickers

How wild were the early days of film? It was said that Henry Lehrman, while directing comedies on Mack Sennett's lot circa 1913, loosed lions upon unsuspecting extras as the cameraman cranked away (cameras were cranked by hand in those days). Hard to believe? I thought so. Then I'm watching Part 8 of Kevin Brownlow and David Gill's superb Hollywood (alas, the 1980 British TV miniseries is not on video or DVD – I taped it from TV). About three minutes into the

doc, in a montage of silent comedy scenes, the legend is verified: You see one of Sennett's few standing sets, familiar in many of his comedies – sometimes a ballroom, sometimes a department store, sometimes a mansion. Long shot: two actors, alarmed at whatever's coming toward them. They run like hell.

Into frame gallop two adult lions, a male and a female. The actors charge toward a staircase leading to the second level of the set. In between the actors and the staircase are maybe a dozen extras in costume, women and men, seemingly in shock. Some stand frozen, eyes fixed on the lions; some - after an instant of realization – scramble this way and that. They're not acting. The two actors bound up the stairway. The lions are right behind them, full tilt - those beasts aren't acting, either. The actors make the top of the stairs just ahead of the lions and run out of frame. The lions tear ass after them. Cut. End of excerpt.


Cavorting with wild beasts was a motif of early cinema, behavior we can take as emblematic of the dares people were willing to chance for the raw excitement of making a flicker (as movies were first called). Gloria Swanson in 1919, age 20, played the lead in Cecil B. DeMille's Male and Female. Clad in several layers of veils, Swanson is cast into a dungeon with a huge male lion. She lies on her stomach. Present were the cameraman and, in her words (from Brownlow and Gill's doc), "Mr. DeMille with a gun, a revolver in his hand, no one else but two trainers. Now let me tell you the sensation - [the lion's] paws, weight, on the back of my bare back. I was bare to the waist. His hot breath. Then when he roared it was like a thousand vibrators all over me. It was the most awesome, dangerous, fascinating ..." (her voice trails off; her eyes gleam). In the finished film, that sequence

passes in mere seconds – seconds that Swanson and DeMille were willing to risk their existences for. Making "pictures," to use their term, was that important to them. (A week later, their lion mauled someone almost to death.)

Or Mabel Normand in 1923's The Extra Girl, in which she casually, blithely enters a cage with several lions. Pets 'em, too. Or the time Ms. Normand (still the most underrated player of the era) pulled a lion by a rope across a set. The gag is that her character believes she's pulling a big dog with a phony lion's mane; but it is, really, a lion. No tricks. There's Mabel, her back to the beast, the rope slung over her shoulder, hauling a reluctant lion some 20 yards across a set. Her only guard was a man off camera with a pitchfork. The lion resisted, jerked her back, she stumbled, the lion was upon her, the pitchfork man lunged, missed the lion, poked Mabel in the butt. Drew blood. The lion, apparently, was well-behaved, because after they tended to Mabel's butt, they reshot the scene later

All of which is to say: Hey, filmmaker, how far are you willing to go to make a picture?

Biographies of the pioneer filmmakers outstrip their legends and read like novels - Charlie Chaplin, Mabel Normand, Buster Keaton, Roscoe Arbuckle, Lillian Gish, D.W. Griffith, Mary Pickford, Mack Sennett, Gloria Swanson, Cecil B. DeMille, Clara Bow, Louise



Brooks, Gish, Chaplin, Pickford, and Keaton had performed professionally since they were as young as 7 (Keaton even younger). Most of the pioneers came from hardscrabble childhoods - as Sennett commented, "There were no dukes on the Mayflower." Few were schooled (yet Normand, Sennett, and Chaplin - among others - were surprisingly well-read). And many - Gish, Chaplin, Pickford, Normand - were entirely on their own when as young as 12 or 13. Some shined in but one film, then disappeared: Ruth Hart's touching, completely naturalistic performance in Griffith's 1909 The Light That Came or Cecile Arnold, in Chaplin's 1914 The Rival Mashers, in which she makes the most of one of cinema's first extended closeups. Special effects, trick shots, trick lighting

(any lighting but daylight) were virtually unknown until circa 1920; in the raucous 19-teens, the actors themselves were the special effects, taking falls and doing stunts with a graceful abandon that is, if anything, more eye-popping in our era of computergenerated effects than it was in those rough times. Maybe they weren't afraid of lions because nearly every time they appeared in front of a camera, the comedians, especially, risked life and limb.

In the context of their time, their pictures, especially the comedies, were more defiantly shocking than we give them credit for. In 1914, respectable women still went about in several layers of clothing, covered from head to foot, their long hair bundled under a wide hat (respectable gals did not



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
go about with an uncovered head). Well, there's Mabel Normand, 1914, in Mabel's Strange Predicament, running around a hotel in pajamas, barefoot, long hair flowing, a spectacle more titillating than we can now imagine. But that doesn't compare with Roscoe Arbuckle's 1917 Coney Island, in which Alice Mann, for several minutes, sports only an almost sheer black body stocking, which leaves little to the imagination. And even that pales beside director Lois Weber's 1915 Hypocrites, a serious examination of America's moral hypocrisies. Weber was more technically adventurous with her camera than Griffith, and her feminism was uncompromising. In Hypocrites, Weber herself portrays the "Naked Truth" in a sheer white body stocking (and sometimes, to my eye, not even that); she is a naked, ghostlike woman spirit, witnessing the unkind, unfair, humiliating ways of so-called normal people. But sometimes social comment was made almost casually, as when, in DeMille's 1917 The Little American, Mary Pickford not only drives her own car (shocking!), but she takes her drive alone (twice as shocking!).

The social impact was deep, wide, and swift, especially for women. In 1915, women were heavily garbed. By the early 1920s, many were wearing hardly anything (from a 1915 point of view) - rather than hiding the body, clothing emphasized the body, influenced largely by Gloria Swanson's costumes in DeMille's films. In 1912, the only women to wear makeup were stage actresses and only when performing. But, with the harsh lighting of early films, lipstick and eye shadow were necessary for men as well as women to register their expressions. By 1920, cosmetics were a thriving industry.

Women had always worn their hair long. In 1923, to play a flapper in Flaming Youth, Colleen Moore cut her hair very short – in imitation, she said, of a Japanese doll. Short hairstyles for women became almost instantly acceptable. Another permanent innovation.

Family values were not much appreciated by these pioneers. From the first, in dramas and comedies alike, marriage was depicted as unmitigated hell. Coney Island expressed it succinctly. There's a fortunetelling machine - ask a question, put in a coin, and it ejects a card with your fortune. Question: "When will I marry and have a happy home?" Answer: "There ain't no such animal."

The flickers were, in short, disruptive and rebellious on a scale that dwarfs even the rock & roll of the Fifties and Sixties. Censorship was attempted, often; it failed, always. Americans seemed to have a consuming hunger for these visual disruptions and wanted nothing more than to imitate them. After all, if petite Mabel Normand could sit playfully with lions, wasn't anything possible?



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
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


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DAVID BOX Box on sax

Thanks to the likes of Boots Randolph and Sonny Rollins, most folks don't think of the saxophone as an instrument for playing classical music. But David Box is doing his bit to change that. This weekend, the Austin-based musician is presenting a concert of music that helps take the instrument back to its roots, showcasing some older works from the classical saxophone repertoire and a few brand-new additions commissioned by Box from friends of his.

Adolphe Sax's new horn didn't generate much in the way of new music in the first years after its introduction in

1836, says Box, a fact that he attributes to Sax already being "hated by many of his peers for causing friction in the instrument inventor circle in Paris, France" with his other new inventions. So initially, the repertoire

consisted of compositions for instruments in a similar range that could be adapted to the saxophone. Over time, however, composers began exploring the instrument's distinctive sound, and now, says Box, "modern repertoire combines traditional classical techniques with every interesting sound a conical-shaped instrument with keys and a vibrating reed on a mouthpiece can make. This makes the life of a modern classical saxophonist versatile and fresh every day."

The works that Box has commissioned are personal in origin, growing out of "Sunday musical brunches with Rob Deemer and Brad Johnston where we talked about [everything from] musical concepts, skills, theory, sports, relationships, et cetera to translating into music intimate stories of love, lust, and an ongoing struggle to wrap our minds around an ever-changing world. I wish to communicate life through music. This desire has me collaborating with individuals constantly to harness our ambition into musical statements about subject matter we are inspired by in life, whether that

> is a text, poem, sunset, murder, theft, war, cancer, AIDS, Sandra Bullock, or a kiss from my dog."

Box generally stayed out of his friends' business as they were composing. Still, a conversation

about music with one or the other of them might lead the composer to make use of an idea that Box was inspired by at the time. "They know I have an open line of communication, and anything they need to talk to me about, or me to them, is always acceptable, even at the endless hours of the night," he says. "This makes the collaborative process fun and produces an environment of positive reinforcement for all the individuals involved." - Robert Faires

RAY DONLEY

Lost and found

The figures on his canvases look as if they were painted hundreds of years ago, but they are recent creations, some brand new. The paintings they appear in are shown across North America and Europe, but they're made here in Austin. And the story behind them is being told in a new documentary, Ray Donley: Dancing the Inquisition Waltz.

It's rare that an Austin artist is the subject of a film, but then Donley is something of a rarity himself: a painter who's also a degreed art historian, a contemporary artist working in a centuries-old representational tradition, an artist who has found international success yet chooses to live and work in Austin, the city of his birth. "People say, 'Ray, why don't you

move to New York and be a bigger artist?' I say: 'No, I'm happy here in Austin, Texas. Anybody can move to New York and make it. It takes a real artist to make it in Texas."

David Box will present a classical saxophone

Donley is making it, routinely showing and selling his work in Berlin, London, Amsterdam, and so on, but the flip side of that is his work is rarely seen in his own hometown. That makes this month's showing of "Ray Donley: Still Awake in the City of Dreadful Night" at the Russell Collection Fine Art Gallery a special treat. The exhibition, which is showing through March 20, naturally features many of those enigmatic, shadow-drenched figures that are Donley's

signature, figures whose "combination of inscrutability and aristocratic beauty ... seduces the viewer." as Molly Beth Brenner wrote in a 2004 Chronicle review. But the show will also include a first for

the artist: a piece of sculpture. "I had this idea - and it could only occur in Austin, I think," says Donley, "that I wanted to do something that would be a summation of much of my work, maybe the darker aspects. It is a skull mounted on a pedestal with a jester's cap. It is my ultimate ecce homo behold the man. What better way to remind someone of the brevity of life than to thrust in their face a skull?"

The impulse to shock someone into thinking about mortality has been driving Donley throughout his career. "I am a differently ordered person," he says. "That is, I probably couldn't be characterized as overly optimistic. I always thought that optimism referred to an eye disease. It's a kind of darker view, but I'm wanting very passionately to say something about the human condition, and I think that's what great art does. It jolts us into taking a refined look at our situation and the kind of world we inherited. maybe to promote change, I don't know. But sometimes my job as an artist is to paint bleakly about bleakness, because that's all I see. 'Los

Bien Perdidos' is what I call my cycle of images: the lost ones, the very lost ones, the profoundly lost ones. And these characters somehow touch on that. These individuals that I create - 99

percent of them through my imagination - are on a journey, some sojourn: getting lost, getting found, getting drunk, getting drunker, setting out. Perhaps suggesting that we're all lost in some emotional, spiritual, psychological, cosmological way. That's been the burden of my art since I announced to the world that I was an artist."

Masters of the all made up

Austin is so packed to the rafters with improvisers right now that you may be wondering why



we'd need to import any from out of state. Well, when they're improvisers on the order of T.J. Jagodowski and Dave Pasquesi, let's just say that it would be like saying, "Since we have so many singer-songwriters here already, why bring that Leonard Cohen guy to town?"

T.J. & Dave, as they're known professionally, are the gold standard for improvisation: keenly skilled, expert practitioners of that demanding art form who can take the stage with nothing – not even an audience suggestion - and spin out of thin air 50 minutes of instant theatre, with varied characters of surprising depth, richly detailed locales, and a forward-moving story of delightful complexity and, by all reports, gut-busting humor. And they do it so effortlessly and so consistently that some suspect them of secretly using scripts - a suspicion that has left the duo telling their audiences: "Trust us. This is all made up."

That catchphrase also serves as the title for a new documentary about T.J. & Dave that will premiere at the 2009 South by Southwest Film Festival. Sold on the Cool

The Blanton's 'Birth of the Cool' is midcentury modernism made sexy

The woman leans back into the sleek black sofa, her blue dress and red nails and lipstick popping against the house's stark white walls, ceiling, and floor – great blocks of white broken only by a few black beams and accent lines like dark bars in an abstract painting. Her head and body are tilted as if she's listening to something, and indeed, behind her stands a man in a dark suit at an entertainment console – a long rectangular box on tubelike metal legs on which sit an ashtray, a planter, and a small sculpture of a bird as smooth and clean as the console itself. The look of it all is cool, as in streamlined, spare, sharp, and up to date (at least for 1958). That makes it cool as in hip, too, and you can imagine this button-down man has just set the needle down on an LP by Chet Baker or Miles Davis, and these two are soaking up the first blue notes of chilled West Coast jazz before slipping into a pair of Tanqueray martinis, extra-dry.

This image by photographer Julius Shulman, taken to showcase the work of architect Pierre Koenig (who is, in fact, the

man at the hi-fi), captures not only the look of midcentury modernism – that clean, minimalist aesthetic – but the *vibe* of it: the chicness, the sophistication, the style. You don't just admire it; you *desire* it. Small wonder, then, that the image is being used by the Blanton Museum of Art to advertise "Birth of the Cool: California Art, Design, and Culture at Midcentury" – and I don't use that verb casually. The era on which this touring exhibit is focused is also the era in which advertising rose to new prominence in American

commerce, as any fan of the cable series *Mad Men* can tell you. Postwar prosperity and the arrival of television combined to create a vast new audience for goods and a powerful new medium for marketing them. And Shulman's photographs, as artful as they are, shimmer with the carefully composed allure of a sales job from back in the day.

Locating us in that era is something this show from the Orange County Museum of Art takes pains to do. The first room is taken up with a lengthy timeline for the year 1959. Text blurbs detail Sen. John F. Kennedy's presidential bid, Nixon squaring off against Khrushchev, and the forward march of the civil rights movement alongside accounts of cultural milestones with interactive elements that are, well, cool. You can listen to cuts from the classic Dave Brubeck Quartet album *Time Out* and Duke Ellington's soundtrack to *Anatomy of a Murder* and watch scenes from Hitchcock's *North by Northwest*,

TV's *The Many Loves of Dobie Gillis*, and *Playboy's Penthouse*, Hugh Hefner's first venture into the television variety/talk show, with Nat "King" Cole, Ella Fitzgerald, and Lenny Bruce as guests. It's fun stuff, and anyone interested in such material is well advised to reserve ample time for taking in the exhibition.

By the time you head toward the bulk of the exhibit's artifacts, you're solidly grounded in this moment in time, and it becomes easier to see this midcentury modernism as a progression from the previous two decades. The clean lines in Koenig's architecture and the hard-edged shapes in the abstract paintings of Lorser Feitelson and Frederick Hammersley and the smooth chairs of Charles and Ray Eames speak to a kind of shedding of ornamentation from previous periods of art and design. It's as if the representational and the decorative were emblematic of the Depression and World War II and were being sloughed off in this era of expansion and prosperity. America couldn't afford to be weighted down with the past as it moved toward the future.

The view in Shulman's photograph *Case Study House* #22 – from the house high on a hill, with the lights of Los Angeles dotting the dark valley below – says it all: We're on top now, the world at our feet. This is our future.

But if we get a good sense of how the country came to this moment in history, we don't get much sense of how modernism got there. Aside from a few references in the timeline to earlier modernist works and creators, the links to the "cool" modernism of midcentury are

missing. It's noted that in 1959, Frank Lloyd Wright passed away, but his influence on the work of Koenig, say, goes unremarked upon. It's only when you see the *North by Northwest* clip, set in a modernist home strikingly similar to Koenig's Case Study homes in the exhibit but based on the designs of Wright, that you gain a sense that the architecture by Koenig and Richard Neutra might have been part of a modernist tradition that had developed over time. The same is true of the furniture design by Charles and Ray Eames; the abstract art by Feitelson, Hammersley, Helen Lundeberg, and others; and the jazz by Davis, Baker, Brubeck, et al.: We're lacking a sense of the history and influences that these were drawn from.

With that present, we'd have an even greater appreciation of what the modernism presented here achieved, how it infused the movement with something new. The cleanliness and elegance of earlier forms – be they Mission Revival architecture,



Scandinavian design, or abstract expressionism — are there, but midcentury modernism added an understated dose of sensuality. You see it in the subtle curves of those Eames chairs, contoured to the body. It's in the muted colors of Lundeberg's architectural abstracts, pale and soothing. You hear it in the laid-back, relaxed rhythms of West Coast jazz played in the exhibition's jazz lounge and see it in William Claxton's breathtakingly sumptuous black-and-white photographs of jazz musicians hanging there: It's all so seductive — modernism made sexy. And at "Birth of the Cool," you just want to ease into it and steep there, like in a hot bath.

At one point in *Mad Men*, adman/cad man Don Draper is dispatched to Southern California to pitch business to the burgeoning aerospace industries. He falls in with a jet-set princess and her decadent Eurotrash family and, amid the perfect weather and pools, contemplates abandoning his East Coast life for this West Coast land of lotus-eaters. It's a temptation that has waylaid many a visitor to the region, and it's part of the secret of the culture of cool documented in the exhibition. It doesn't just strip away the ornament and decoration, but like SoCal seems to do, it strips away the struggle and strain of life, leaving just what's smooth and loose and chill.

You gotta figure that Don Draper could come up with an irresistible way to sell that. But he wouldn't need to. Cool sells itself.





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No Small Feat

Scott Blackwood's novel experiments in form

Scott Blackwood's slim debut novel, We Agreed to Meet Just Here, clocks in at 162 pages, and its original title was See How Small (which references a line in the novel: "See how small a thing it is that keeps us apart"). Blackwood smiles, remembering the reaction that original title sparked. "One of the readers said, oh, I can see the reviews now: 'See how small Scott Blackwood tries to make the novel ... and fails." He laughs. "It was great."

The thing is, Blackwood didn't just set out to write a short novel, although he firmly believes that novels have gotten too long, too watereddown, and too, well, unedited (an opinion also informed by his experience as a columnist for Bookslut). Quite simply, Blackwood wanted to "explode" the novel – to shake it loose from its moorings, its predictable patterns.

What that meant for his book was an impressionistic style, with dead characters both fictional and real (like Jonestown's Jim Jones) freely interacting with the living and those maybe in limbo. There was also the use

of the collective voice. "Agents wanted to jettison parts of it," says Blackwood, "and I just stuck by my guns. I believed in it, and I wasn't going to start meddling with stuff that I had felt very strongly about."

The first person plural is an uncommon aesthetic choice, one that beautifully illustrates the book's setting and sensibility – that of the fabric of a community. The community in question is Austin's Deep Eddy neighborhood, in which two of its residents, an 18-year-old girl and an octogenarian in failing health, both go missing within days of each other. It was in the conception of the latter - a doctor named Odie Dodd - that Blackwood's book first sparked, that "sky-parting" moment. For Blackwood, it came when he stumbled across an obituary in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram about Lionel Luckhoo, who was Jim Jones' attorney in Guyana, in addition to being a traveling magician and a knighted British barrister who was called the "Perry Mason of the Caribbean." (Blackwood also points out that Luckhoo was the inspiration for *The Simpsons*' Lionel Hutz, although that little tidbit didn't make the obituary.)

Luckhoo's final career was a reaction to his near miss at Jonestown. "He was supposed to be there for the White Nights mass suicide, because Jones had intended him to be there," explains Blackwood. "Or he had just forgotten – it's unclear ... if it was just an appointment that Jones had forgotten all about." For whatever reason, Luckhoo was delayed on his way to Jonestown, and "to Luckhoo, it was God's hand saving him, so he became an evangelist."

Blackwood had to pare back the Luckhoo story - "it was such a bizarre and fantastic kind of obit that it was impossible to use as fiction straight up" - but what stuck with him was Luckhoo's need to tell his story again and again, to evangelize. The fictional Odie Dodd – who in Blackwood's book is a doctor who was meant to be at Jonestown but arrived too late - does much the same, repeating the story, haunted, at neighborhood parties and backyard barbecues. It's a recurring theme in the book, what Blackwood calls "people's ability, their struggle, to tell their own story as opposed to having their story told for them." For Odie, "he's been stuck in a circular story for a long time." The how of his brush with death he's lived with for years, but the why he's never resolved.



The novel traffics in familiar Austin terrain – Red Bud Island, a summer screening of *The Third Man*, one of the author's favorite films, at the Paramount – but, for now, Blackwood is shifting settings for his new novel. Until last June, he ran the Undergraduate Writing Center at the University of Texas, but he's now situated in Chicago as the director of the Master of Fine Arts Creative Writing program at Roosevelt University. He's also enjoying his win for the 2007 Associated Writing Program's Prize for the Novel, a success that can't help but feel especially vindicating after so many skeptical readers, the ones who thought he was laying waste to a hallowed form.

"I had an interesting reaction from outside readers who were both novelists. It really pissed them off," he remembers. "They wrote things like, 'This is not a novel.'" Blackwood grins. "And I thought: 'This is good. I hit a nerve here."

AMERICAN RUST: A NOVEL

by Philipp Meyer Spiegel & Grau, 367 pp., \$24.95

Philipp Meyer, a recent graduate of the University of Texas' Michener Center for Writers, has impeccable, even prescient, timing with his first novel. Not only does bestseller-list resident Patricia Cornwell plug American Rust in her latest novel (they share an agent), but our recently recognized economic woes get the microcosm treatment in the author's crumbling

treatment in the author's crumbling
Pennsylvania town, which lives and dies with the rise and fall of the steel industry – what Meyer calls the "ugly reverse of the American Dream."

The novel centers on two college-aged friends of the opposites-attract mold: Poe, the broad-shouldered, exfootball star, and Isaac, an anemic brainiac who decides to run away from home and his invalid father. These best-laid plans are thwarted by a killing, and the plot is kicked into action.


The steel town's decline takes place on the macro scale, with the battered economy leaving houses dilapidated and Camaros – once a sign of American excess – sitting dormant in fields. Moral and emotional decline, on the other hand, are tracked in the form of infidelity, murder, and denial, as character flaws become deep cracks. Meyer writes his characters' thoughts into the prose, showing how a town's battery of shattered dreams can alter actions in drastic ways.

Fittingly, Isaac's sister picks up a copy of James Joyce's *Ulysses* then looks for works by Henry James. Both authors defined and perfected modernism's ability to get into characters' heads to better elucidate action.

Meyer is not yet worthy of that particular company but still has startling and recognizable insight into diverse characters' thought patterns that speaks to a talent of great promise. The passing whims of wandering minds are often engaging, but the circular and repetitious nature of some passages frustrates at times. Perhaps this is a testament to Meyer's ability to write thoughts realistically, but it drags in spots. Nevertheless, by book's end you are left with lush, detailed, and ultimately believable characters – characters who know love and loyalty are a rare commodity in their town, where fading hopes create strong personal bonds.

FILM Awhile back, attorney/film producer Mark Mueller (www.voodoocowboy.com) invited me to see a rough cut of his new movie, **The** 2 Bobs, directed by Tim McCanlies. Honestly, it wasn't my kind of movie. So whether you're up for a lilting ballad from Ed Miller or a slam dance with the Black Irish, you'll never be far from a fresh Harp, Guinness, or Smithwick's.

The following locations take St. Patrick's Day very seriously, investing time, effort, and money into throwing a serious party. Each of the six locations (nine counting the three Opal

open until 2am.

Divine's) offers stellar pub grub with an Irish heart, and all know how to pull a proper Guinness. Music acts are still changing, so be sure to check the websites or call for the full details.

B.D. Riley's Irish Pub (204 E. Sixth, 494-1335, www.bdrileys.com) will be offering some of the best Irish music in town from 11am to 11pm, with no cover. The food is always great, especially the fish and chips (\$12.95). Open from 10:30am to 2am.

Bull McCabe's (714 Red River, 472-1170, www.myspace.com/bullmccabesirishpub) isn't offering anything different than its usual honest Irish ambience. This is the place in town you are most likely to hear true Irish accents on both sides of the bar.

The biggest music party in town for St. Patrick's Day is at the **Dog & Duck Pub** (406 W. 17th, 479-0598, www.dogandduckpub.com). It is quickly approaching its 20th year in Austin, a landmark it's hit by offering great pub grub and by treating brewed beverages with reverence. Music will be from 11am to 11pm, capped off by some

Owned by the Meehan family (all of Irish descent), the place is based on the amiable family pubs of rural Ireland. Its event is billed as "the Largest St. Patrick's Day Event in Central Texas." Most importantly, it's bringing in fiddlers of international renown such as Brian Conway, Kevin Burke, and Johnny Gimble (see www.stpatricksdayaustin.com for a full lineup). Tickets are \$10, and the music will run from noon to 12mid.

Fancy getting your head shaved for charity? Then head to **Mother Egan's Irish Pub** (715 W. Sixth, 478-7747, **www.motheregans irishpub.com**) around 5pm. Otherwise, the music will be running from noon to 1am with a \$5 cover. The crowds line up early and stay late, so plan on getting there at the beginning of the day or standing in line. Open until 2am.

All three **Opal Divine's** (www.opaldivines.com) will be celebrating St. Patrick's Day with generous musical offerings from noon to 10:30pm. Owner Michael Parker not only hires and trains some of the best bartenders in Austin; he also makes sure that each location is chock-full of great beers and top whiskeys from both Ireland and Scotland. All locations will be open until 2am: the Freehouse (700 W. Sixth, 477-3308), Penn Field (3601 S. Congress, 707-0237), Marina (12709 MoPac at Parmer, 733-5353).

Happy birthday!... The Zagat Texas Restaurants 2009 guide was released last week, offering reviews of 1,600 Texas eateries in five major cities. Frequent Chronicle contributor Claudia Alarcón edited the section on Austin restaurants. 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Texas Culinary Icons | Barbecue Brisket

Six dishes that help define Texas cuisine and the best places to find them in Austin



Breakfast Tacos

The taco is the Mexican version of a universal portable peasant food: some kind of flat bread - in this case, corn or flour tortillas with a savory filling. The Tex-Mex breakfast taco is the definitive morning repast of choice in these parts: heading east from here, the American South truly begins when they disappear from the culinary landscape, and once we travel west of the Trans-Pecos, corn tortillas become scarce, and big, stuffed flour tortillas are known as burritos.

Breakfast tacos are omnipresent in Austin warm corn or flour tortillas stuffed with scrambled eggs and your choice of a variety of accompaniments including crisp bacon, spicy Mexican chorizo, refried beans, fried potato cubes, pico de gallo (a fresh relish of onions, tomatoes, cilantro, and chopped peppers), and/or grated cheddar cheese. Ordered to go, the tacos will arrive wrapped in paper or tinfoil and are often served with tiny containers of fresh salsa on the side, the better to spice them up to your personal taste. This hand-held mainstay of the local cuisine is available at countless Mexican restaurants, taco trailers, and many local convenience stores, made fresh daily. They'll set you back anywhere from 99 cents to \$1.99 each and get your day off to a nourishing, affordable start. While it's true that some regional and national fast-food chains have developed their own versions of breakfast tacos, so many fresh, tasty,

local options abound that it really won't ever be necessary to go the prefab route while visiting here. After starting every day of your Austin sojourn with a breakfast taco feast, you'll become habituated and wonder how you ever lived without them. That's a promise. Here's a reliable list to help get you started. - V.B.W.

Barbecue cooked in Texas is the best in the nation, period. And the best barbecue in Texas is that which is produced in what's called the "Barbecue Belt" - basically a 30- to 40-mile swath that roughly parallels I-35 on a map, starting around Georgetown and heading off toward San Marcos. Austin is the buckle of that belt. It includes the towns of Taylor (and Lexington if you stretch it out), Elgin, Lockhart, and Luling (and Gonzales if you pooch it on the end). In these towns you can find the high holy temples of American barbecue: Louie Mueller Barbecue, Taylor Cafe, Snow's BBQ, Southside Market, Black's Barbecue, Smitty's Market, Kreuz Market, Luling City Market, and Gonzales Food Market. Head west, and you have Opie's Barbecue, the Salt Lick, Inman Ranch House, and Cooper's Pit Bar-B-Que. It's the barbecue bucket list, and none of them is more than an hour away.

Barbecued brisket is unique to Texas. Edgar Black Sr., of Black's in Lockhart, was the first one to start cooking brisket around these parts. The rich folks bought the steaks, and most of the rest became smoked sausage. Edgar Sr. decided that the brisket was a cut that would benefit from many hours of low and slow smoking. He started a trend, and while the rest of the country soaks their brisket in pickling spices to make corned beef, Central Texans like

it seasoned simply, slow-smoked, sliced, and served on a piece of butcher paper.

Just because you're eating brisket doesn't mean you have to pass on the sausage, pork or beef ribs, or shoulder clod (basically the chuck shoulder roast). Some use live-oak or post-oak logs, some add pecan, and some believe in the powers of mesquite, but regardless of the wood, it's all going to be coated with a spice rub and cooked slowly in clouds of fragrant smoke. Whether you're eating in town, just outside town, or out of town, there's incredible barbecue to be found around Austin. - M.V.

Chicken-Fried Steak

It is only fitting that a state with a storied history of great cattle ranches and legendary cattle drives would claim a slice of fried beef round known as chicken-fried steak as a quintessential dish. Why "chicken-fried" steak, you may ask? Because the original trailside and home-style versions of tenderized round steak were prepared in the same manner as a boned fryer – dredged in seasoned flour, liquid (milk, buttermilk, or eggs), more flour, and then panfried in a cast-iron skillet of hot grease. This style of cooking rendered a toothsome piece of beef encased in a crackling crust, often napped with cream gravy flecked with cracked black pepper and bits of crust left in the skillet and usually paired with fluffy mashed potatoes.

The cooking style changed when the dish made the transition from ranch-house table to roadside cafe menu. In the interest of speed and efficiency, chicken-fried steaks were prepared in the deep fryer. This version wasn't quite perfection, not really as good as the one from Grandma's table, but much easier for the restaurant cook. As the popularity of the dish spread and restaurants proliferated, an economical, restaurant-ready frozen product emerged on the market: wafer-thin, machine-tenderized, and prebreaded patties packed three, four, or five to a pound. These pieces of mystery meat are often served with a watery instant gravy mix and reconstituted powdered spuds – quick and cheap, edible and filling, but not the genuine article. No, sir, not by a long shot.

Try the chicken-fried rib eye.

In order to savor the authentic chicken-fried steak experience, you want a 5- or 6-ounce piece of tenderized round steak of legitimate thickness, hand-breaded in seasoned flour, and fried to crispy perfection. It should arrive at the table under a mantle of velvety, peppery cream gravy, nestled against a serving of real mashed potatoes. Add the salad and vegetables of your choice. Grandma has long since gone to her reward, but we're confident you can find a real chicken-fried steak at these local eateries. - V.B.W.

Frozen Margaritas

There are plenty of colorful anecdotes from the 1930s and 1940s about the origins of the tequila-based cocktail known as the margarita. Some of the stories feature movie stars and bartenders in Mexican resorts or savvy hostesses from the American Southwest. Regardless of its origin, the margarita - tequila, triple sec, and lime juice in a salt-rimmed glass - became popular with Americans traveling in Mexico,

and demand for the cocktail increased in the United States as tequila became more widely distributed.

The widespread emergence of margaritas as the perfect liquid complement to Mexican food in Texas is somewhat



easier to track, because liquor by the drink became legal in our fair state again in 1971, after a very long dry spell. Mexican restaurant patrons enjoyed margaritas straight up or on the rocks until an ingenious Dallas restaurateur began serving an iced version prepared in a blender. The new version proved very popular, but Mariano Martinez had trouble keeping up with customer demand for the blended drinks, and quality control was sometimes an issue, as well. Martinez experienced a eureka moment looking at a 7-Eleven Slurpee machine one day in 1971 and realized it could be the solution to his problem. He bought a used Slurpee machine, did some tinkering, and consulted chemist John Hogan about developing a recipe for margaritas that would emerge stable and semifrozen, just like Slurpees or soft-serve ice cream. (Sugar is the secret ingredient.) The rest is history - the new frozen cocktail really hit the spot with heatparched Texas restaurant patrons, and because Martinez never got a patent on his innovation, restaurants and bars across the state were soon serving their own versions of frozen margaritas to thirsty consumers.

That original retrofitted Slurpee machine from Mariano's Hacienda has now joined other American innovations in the Smithsonian. It was replaced by several machines designed specifically for the production of frozen margaritas, now a regular feature in just about any Texas Mexican restaurant with a liquor license. Most restaurant drink recipes are carefully guarded secrets, and as with all Mexican dishes, folks here have very strong opinions about where the best frozen margaritas can be found. Our favorites are made with real fruit juice (or, in some cases, purees of fruits such as mango, strawberry, or avocado) and as little sugar as possible, rather than the **FONDA SAN MIGUEL** 2330 W. 
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





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Back before there was Samuel Adams, Sierra Nevada, or Real Ale, there was Shiner beer. Back before there was Jim Koch, there was Kosmos Spoetzl. Back before the microbrewery explosion – heck, back before the word "microbrewery" was coined - there was the Shiner Brewing Association.

It's been 100 years since a group of German and Czech immigrants sat down and decided – in a very different brewing landscape than today's glitzy, marketing-driven one – that the townsfolk of tiny Shiner, Texas (population 2,070), needed to satisfy their beer needs with their own hands. They just wanted to immediately gratify their desire for a taste of the Old Country - they didn't realize they were giving birth to history.

It's a history that saw their organization's ownership pass to Bavarian brewmaster Kosmos Spoetzl - who built Spoetzl Brewery from 1914 until his death in 1950, even through Prohibition - and then to his daughter, and eventually to Carlos Alvarez's Gambrinus Co., which turned it from near-bankruptcy to a regional brewing powerhouse. It's a history worth telling, a true piece of classic Texana (with a heavy dose of Austin), and in his new book, Shine On: 100 Years of Shiner Beer, Dallas author Mike Renfro has done just that, crafting a gorgeous coffeetable book that perfectly captures an older Texas that is fading away and a brewery that almost faded with it. Lee Nichols

Austin Chronicle: Describe the genesis of this book. Did Spoetzl approach you about writing Shine On or vice versa?

Mike Renfro: They approached me. Shiner had decided some time ago that they wanted to do some sort of commemorative book, but they knew that they didn't want it to be just sort of a self-written corporate propaganda piece. They wanted it to stand on its own merits, as well. I'd done some commentaries on NPR back in the Nineties. They always called me their "Texas foreign correspondent." It was usually a Texas-centric kind of thing, so I think those made [Shiner] immediately think of me. AC: Describe to me the process of putting the narrative together: how you got your information and who you interviewed.

MR: It was a combination of sitting down with a number of folks, including the lady who does

the tours there at the brewery and serves as their local PR person, and sitting down with people like her or [brewmaster] Jimmy Mauric. And John Hybner, who was the brewmaster from the early Seventies until '05. And those guys were great, because both of them were pretty much lifers, had been there since they were 18 or 19. They took me back first-person into the Sixties.

And then there was a lot of digging through ... and going up into the brewery, up top; on the top floor there was literally just a room with boxes, and they have not been very good about archiving. It was like going into your grandmother's house, up in the attic, and finding little treasures that no one's probably touched in 40 years. We found everything from old promotional signs to handwritten receipts and estimates of things [such as] brewery improvements.

There were also some old reel-to-reel audio tapes from a film about the brewery back in '76 with Miss Celie, Kosmos' daughter. So we actually had her voice telling us some awesome, great stories. They probably had a couple of hours of just her reminiscing in 1976 when she was about 82.

And we sat down also in a couple of little town-hall-type meetings ... by putting a notice

in the paper down there; we invited everybody who had ever had anything to do with the brewery whether you worked there or your daddy worked there or your husband or whoever.

AC: The archival stuff - what kind of condition was it in?

MR: Some of it – well, you can tell by looking at some of the photographs. Some of the stuff that made its way in there is in kind of poor condition, so that would tell you there's a whole lot that didn't make it that had been leaked upon from the roof of the attic over there or whatever else. Some of the stuff we got courtesy of people who had stuff in their own attics or pictures in their own archives, and that included the guys who were the distributors in Austin in the Seventies, and it also included random folks. Not to say anything bad about the folks Spoetzl Brewery's at Spoetzl, their attitude has always been, "We're focused on making the beer today," and they don't think much about stuff like that.

AC: What was the most surprising thing you learned in researching this book?

MR: I guess how close they came to shutting down in the Eighties. My experience with the brand had been: I was first introduced to it in the late Seventies when I started school in Austin. At that point, it was sort of considered the dregs of the dregs. It was like a step below Lone Star. It was Shiner Premium at that point – I never even saw Bock, and then Bock kind of exploded in the

Seventies into the Eighties, on a more mainstream level in the late Eighties. Right before Gambrinus came in and Carlos [Alvarez] bought the place, they were literally going to go under, and I had no idea it was that close to that.

AC: Do you recall your first experience with Shiner?

MR: Uh ... gol-lee. I think it was probably my freshman year in college and trying to do every-

thing we could to save some money when we'd go out on Friday and opening up a case. And having grown up in North Texas, Shiner wasn't even distributed up here at that point. I remember buying some just because it was cheaper than Lone Star. And we were a little bit worried - we weren't big fans of how Lone Star tasted necessarily, but we were a little worried, "Oh man, if it's cheaper than Lone Star" I remember being pleasantly surprised that the Premium tasted a lot smoother than the Lone Star did.

AC: I've always wondered something. I grew up in a small town, and I know how beer tastes in small towns go – most people are drinking Bud Light or Miller Lite. What do most people who live in Shiner actually drink? And which Shiner do they prefer, if they drink Shiner?

MR: [Laughs] The older ones, I think, probably still drink what they consider Premium, which is now Blonde. That's what they sold the most of up into the Seventies or Eighties until it all flipped around. They were 80/20 Premium to Bock, and I think a lot of the older,

older ones, just out of habit, still drink that. I get the impression there are guys that will look around, and if they need to feel like they're in their chamber of commerce mode, they'll make sure they're drinking the Shiner, but they may have a case of Bud Light out in the garage when they're mowing the yard. I'm not absolutely sure that's the case. But I think there is a real pride in a lot of the people of: "Hey, I live here. I gotta drink this.'

Shiner 100 Commemorator

If you're a Texas beer geek, you're surely aware that Spoetzl Brewery celebrates its 100th anniversary this year. For five years now, the makers of Shiner beer have been advertising this coming occasion in the best way possible: by brewing more beer and getting adventurous in their offerings and exploring their German heritage. Beginning in 2005, the brewery's 96th year, it put out the limited-edition Shiner 96, a rich Märzenstyle lager. That was followed each year with another limited

release: 97 (a schwarzbier, or black lager), 98 (Bavarian amber), and 99 (Munich-style Helles).

Culminating this five-year party is Shiner 100 Commemorator, a hearty "starkbier," or "dopplebock" (double bock). I'm happy to report that, to celebrate such a huge event as 100 years of business, brewmaster Jimmy Mauric has done well. With its thick malt profile typical of this style, this beer practically screams, "Germany!" And yet, it's surprisingly light for the dopplebock style, and thus possibly more accessible to drinkers who never go heavier than a Shiner Bock. Perhaps you could say it has "drinkability." One of my beerblogging colleagues suggested that Shiner 100 is what Shiner Bock (which is not actually a true bock) ought to be. I'm inclined to agree.

Shiner 97, the black lager, proved to be so popular that it found a place in Shiner's permanent lineup. I hope it won't be the only one from the anniversary series to do so - I'm already missing the beers that have gone out of production and hope they'll return on at least a seasonal basis. And Shiner 100 is as deserving as any of such status. - L.N.

Pecan Pie

"Pecan" is from an Algonquian word meaning a nut requiring a stone to crack, but that native tribe obviously wasn't familiar with the modern paper-shell hybrids. The tree is native to the South Central United States and grows all the way from Illinois to Veracruz, Mexico. Pecan production first started as a commercial operation by merely gathering native nuts and selling them to the highest bidder. Texas native pecans were shipped to Europe for sale as early as 1840, and today, Texas averages 60 million pounds of pecans annually, divided equally between natives and orchard-grown hybrids. Texas is the largest producer of native pecans and second only to Georgia in the production of hybrid varieties.

The nut is so popular in Texas that in 1919 the Texas Legislature made the pecan the state tree. In 1909, Gov. James S. Hogg asked that a pecan tree be planted as his headstone so the nuts could be sent all over Texas to be planted, making it a "land of trees." Some call the pecan the miracle tree, producing not only good strong wood for furniture and cooling shade in the heat of summer but also nuts that can reduce cholesterol. Majestic in the landscape, it produces a wood quite worthy for barbecuing, it keeps our seniors out of trouble (by gathering and cracking nuts), but more importantly, the pecan makes a damn fine pie.

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A Texas pecan pie should have a rich, flaky crust, and the filling needs to be primarily nuts and not just a bunch of goopy gelatinized filling with a thin layer of nuts on top. It should taste like roasted pecans, with a buttery brown-sugar flavor that isn't too sweet. It should be served by someone friendly who has either a drawl, a twang, or both. And if you're lucky, it will be warm, with a scoop of Blue Bell Homemade Vanilla nestled next to it. For great local versions, try these.

Blue Bell Ice Cream

Texas' own Blue Bell is the third most popular ice cream in the country, but it's sold in only 16 states. That speaks volumes about the loyalty of its customers and the quality of the ice cream. Blue Bell began in 1907, down the road not far south of Austin in a lit-



tle town called Brenham. A group of local farmers were blessed with too much cream and decided to open a butter-churning operation, and the Brenham Creamery Co. was born. With more milk came the decision to add ice cream to the mix, and soon the company was delivering by horse and wagon to local customers. In 1930, that little German-American creamery decided to name itself after a local wildflower, the Texas Bluebell (Eustoma grandiflorum).

Now Blue Bell has four plants, one in Oklahoma, one in Alabama, and two in Brenham. The milk from 50,000 Jersey and Holstein cows from dairies within 200 miles of Brenham is delivered every day. That milk produces about 50 different rotating flavors a year – a core list of 17 permanent flavors, plus others changing region to region, based on what is seasonal. The ice cream is made in rows of 60-gallon, small-batch freezers, and the company's goal, according to President Emeritus

Howard Kruse, is "to fill our customers up on taste, not on fat and sugar." Blue Bell still makes half gallons, and the ice cream isn't pumped full of air like its competitors'. Blue Bell is so good that LBJ used to load up the galley freezers of Air Force One to haul it back to D.C., and in 1995 *Atlantis* shuttle astronauts insisted it be launched with them into space.

An essential piece of travel gear while in Austin is a spoon, since Blue Bell is sold in many convenience stores, and you never know when you might need a fix. Word: The new Mocha Madness flavor is deliciously addictive! For more civilized tasting, there are several Central Austin spots that serve Blue Bell.

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

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

Welcome, South by Southwest visitors. Consider this your quickie primer to all (or at least some) things Austintatious and Texan. Let's begin by pointing out how one becomes a Texan. Consider Billy Bob Thornton, who was born in Arkansas but starred as Texas legend Davy Crockett in The Alamo and as a Texas high school football coach in Friday Night Lights. Thornton is now a Texan. Case closed. He receives the Tom Mix Honorary Texan Award during the Texas Film Hall of Fame ceremonies March 12 at Austin Studios. If you read this in time, a ticket can be had for as little as \$100 to \$500 if you want to be a high roller. Last minute changes: Brendan Fraser (replacing John Cusack) will present Twilight director Catherine Hardwicke as she is inducted. **Tobe Hooper**, director of the original *The* Texas Chainsaw Massacre, is also on the bill (a restored version of his debut film, Eggshells, will also screen at SXSW). Joining Hardwicke and Thornton as new inductees are Larry Hagman, Powers Boothe, and the film Rushmore. Richard Linklater will honor the late Horton Foote, as well. More info is at www.austin film.org/tfhof... Linklater was among an estimated 1,000 film folks to converge on the Capitol last week seeking to convince the Legislature to reconfigure the state's filming incentives program to be more competitive. At a committee hearing for the new film bill, Linklater said he has a film set in Texas that is ready to go but perhaps headed to Shreveport if Texas' current 5% incentives program is not augmented (Louisiana offers a 25% tax incentive). Likewise, Garry Brown, the producer who brought two seasons of Prison Break to Dallas, said he has a television pilot eyeing a Dallas shoot that would be a sure thing with larger incentives... Austin's own Robert Rodriguez is writing and directing the futuristic thriller Nerverackers, according to Daily Variety, but no word on what amount will be shot locally (my guess is most). The story is about Joe Tezca, sent to quell a crime wave in 2085. Lots of Texas films will premiere at SXSW, but doc The Least of These is notable for its concurrent premiere online through IndiePix partner SnagFilms as either an electronic download or DVD delivered by snail mail. The film chronicles the T. Don Hutto medium-security prison in Taylor, which became a detention facility for families awaiting deportation. That's not the only SXSW film to follow a unique distribution model; several IFC films, including Joe Swanberg's Alexander the Last, will premiere concurrently at the Fest and on demand via IFC's Festival Direct.

Not too long ago, Spout.com's Karina Longworth – an indispensable voice on independent film – mused that "although Austin has become a place where independent filmmakers from all over the country — including LA and New York — come to show work, ironically, Austin's past and present identity as a film town often gets lost in that process and excluded from the conversation." Well, then: Let's talk, shall we?

This year, we put the home team on the cover, addressing in part the idea of this "past and present identity" with faces from Austin's film community, from the "old guard" of Linklater, Rodriguez, Judge, and McCanlies - all of whom will be involved in some capacity at this year's Festival and continue to mentor and support the community they helped create to the new guys. "New" is perhaps disingenuous: Three of the filmmakers profiled have three or more features under their belts, and you can bet all of them have been laboring at this thing for years, even if it was just storyboarding the movies in their minds during algebra class.

I suppose we could be accused of being sentimental; like so many other regional filmmaking hubs, ours has taken a hit, and we really do want to celebrate the Austin film community. But the thing is, we've seen the films of the five "new kids" on our cover, and they're all good. They're great, actually. And that's just the tip of the iceberg – there are loads more homegrown films at the Fest, such as the competition films *Artois the Goat* and *The Overbrook Brothers*, and films from, well, let's call 'em the peripatetic Austinites, such as *St. Nick*'s David Lowery – filmmakers who work and live here off and on but keep coming back because they know Austin treats film, and filmmakers, right.

The town's identity is ever in flux: Sometimes the story is a big-budget to-do; sometimes it's the micro-indie seemingly every name in Austin had a hand in. This much we know: that Austin is a town where you can borrow the camera off your neighbor's back; turn to a university full of sharp, talented folks who will crew for the price of a plate of migas; get a deal on your sound mix at a local studio; have a home for your work-in-progress at the Austin Film Society; and – oh yeah – find a champion in the local fish wrap.

In short: Welcome to Austin. It's totally worth the shitty summers. $\hfill\blacksquare$

Remembering Clarence Swensen By JOE O'CONNELL

Follow Clarence Swensen down a hotel hallway, and you would be certain he was the biggest film star in Austin. Jaws dropped at the sight of the green fez and spangly uniform that marked him as an authentic Munchkin from *The Wizard of Oz*. He was quickly surrounded by a mix of college students and middle-agers begging for autographs. (Following the code of the handful of living Munchkins, he required \$5 payment.)

I was his guide/driver in 2004, as Swensen, who died Feb. 25 at age 91, spoke at a convention of college journalists in Austin. His Pflugerville home was stashed full of *Oz* memorabilia, but his memories were even clearer. Judy Garland was just a sweet 16-year-old who invited the Munchkins into her trailer and gave each an autographed photo. Toto the dog received \$125 a week to act while the Munchkins were paid \$50 each. Clark Gable, who was filming *Gone With the Wind* on a neighboring set, chatted up all of Swensen's wide-eyed 4 feet 6¾ inches ("Don't forget the three-quarters!" Swensen joked) but never once mentioned the movie business.

Swensen told me of the prejudice he faced growing up in Austin as a little person, of how the movie business was a youthful lark. Before *Oz*, he played seven roles in campy little people Western *The*

Terror of Tiny Town — one was the sole speaking part of his career — and later donned a chimp suit for Tarzan Finds a Son! with Johnny Weissmuller.

He was 22 when Oz filmed, and his future wife, Myrna, was only 13. An inflamed appendix stopped her from traveling to California for the Oz shoot, ending her shot at Munchkin fame. Her father, also a little person, had traveled the country from 1917 to 1925 as Buster Brown, and Myrna had tap danced and sang at a traveling Midget Village that stopped at the Dallas World's Fair in 1936.

But Myrna and Clarence, married 65 years, together found a second Oz wind after Clarence retired from a technical job at the University of Texas. He donned the Munchkin uniform once more, and the pair attended 15 to 20 conventions a year, becoming best friends with fellow Munchkin Margaret Pellegrini, who is known as the Flowerpot Lady. Clarence knew his place: Four rows back on the end as the Munchkin army leads Dorothy off to see the Wizard. Ultimately, the classic film taught the Swensens real lessons about life and love. About what it really means to live a big life. "Everybody has courage if they use it," Myrna Swensen told me then. "Everybody has a head. Everybody has a heart if they use it."

Every Step They Take

Kathryn Bigelow dramatizes the dangerous business of bomb detonation in 'The Hurt Locker'

Only a few weeks are left before their tour in Iraq is over. Close but no cigar; in fact, the cigar may blow up in their faces at any moment. They are the bomb techs, the guys in the elite Explosive Ordnance Disposal squad. Their dangerous mission disarming detonation devices in the streets of Iraq provides the suspenseful dramatic frisson in Kathryn Bigelow's new movie, The Hurt Locker.

Unlike the raft of movies about Iraq that have skittered across our screens and collective consciousness since the beginning of the war, Bigelow's film is not a documentary. Nor does it take political sides or have any axes to grind. The Hurt Locker is a war movie about soldiers and their dangerous mission; the conflict comes both from within and without. The grist for this narrative feature comes from screenwriter Mark Boal, an investigative journalist who was embedded with a bomb squad in Iraq. (Boal's firsthand reports from Iraq also supplied the source material for Paul Haggis' 2007 drama, In the Valley of Elah.)

Throughout her career, Bigelow has delivered numerous genre films that obey the traditional conventions yet never fully conform. The characters always provide entryways into her stories, rather than serving as mere chess pieces furthering the narrative. Whether

it's the vampire family ties of Near Dark, the surfing bank robbers of Point Break, the female rookie in the cop drama Blue Steel, the excop turned dream dealer in the futuristic conspiracy thriller Strange Days, or the doomed Russian submarine commanders in K-19: The Widowmaker, the characters are always the standouts in Bigelow's films. The men of The Hurt Locker's EOD squad are no different, and it matters not a bit that the film is set in 2004 and that there now exists a timeline for American withdrawal in Iraq. The Hurt Locker tells the story of soldiers who are willing to go beyond the front lines, walk right up to the bomb, and defy the instinct for selfpreservation. It's this psychology - common to all battlefronts despite the specifics of the danger – that intrigues Bigelow, which is what may make The Hurt Locker the first film about the Iraq war to have widespread appeal when

it opens in theatres this summer.

Spotlight Premieres, U.S. Premiere Tuesday, March 17, 6:30pm, Paramount Austin Chronicle: Most of your action films have been in widescreen, and Hurt Locker was shot in the squarer 1:85 format. Why did you make that choice? Kathryn Bigelow: It was basically something that [cinematographer] Barry [Ackroyd] and I wanted very much to do. The story is obviously these EOD experts and what their daily life is like on the ground in Baghdad. I wanted to put the audience in their shoes, to the extent I can, and not have the filmmaking experience be so specific that you're aware of the filmmaking. I wanted to

put the filmmaker aside and

just tell these men's stories. I think they're the real unsung heroes of the war, and since it's a war of bombs, their ability, their courage, their bravery, their heroism - though it may come at a price – their heroism is something I felt it very important to pay tribute to.

AC: I felt that 1:85 format gave it more of a realistic newsreel kind of look than a "cinematic" wide-screen look.

> KB: I don't think of it like that. It is actually, but I would probably replace the word "newsreel"


with "immediate." It's so very immediate and not glamorized or cinematic even though there's nothing wrong with that. But for this particular story, which is pretty graphic and authentic and realistic, I wanted it to feel very immediate and accessible and not put

through the lens of something more aestheticized. And it's been an underreported war, so I think the daily life of a bomb tech in Baghdad is something that most people know very little about.

AC: A lot of the film uses handheld POV too, which adds to that immediacy.

KB: Right. Again, it was my interest to give the audience a you-are-there experience and to make it really experiential, so you become the fourth man on the team. You're actually in the Humvee with them, really sharing, day in and day out, the life that these incredible soldiers experience on a daily basis. I tried to make it as authentic, raw, real, and unmediated an experience for the viewer as possible.

AC: The Hurt Locker uses narrative strategies that I haven't seen before in all the various Iraq movies out there, most of which have been docs.



reintegration-into-the-home-front film. I never looked at The Hurt Locker as part of any tradition other than war films. Classic war films ... about men who arguably have the most dangerous job in the world ... and yet it's a volunteer army. It's an interesting psychology ... complicated and multilayered.

AC: The movie's opening quote concludes that "war is a drug." Are you telling us that these bomb techs are basically adrenaline junkies?

KB: Yeah, well, there's a kind of allure to combat. The author of that quote, Chris Hedges, has written a pretty extraordinary book called War Is a Force That Gives Us Meaning. And he talks about the allure of combat, and it's a beautifully argued statement. It's really looking at that threshold - what are the limits of bravery? - and how bravado alone may not save your life. What would enable you to walk down a street - the entire place is contained, you're walking by yourself, there's nobody there who can help you - toward this object in the middle of the ground. It's just extraordinary conceptually. That was really the genesis of the project, along with Mark [Boal]'s bringing that information back from his Iraq reporting. It's pretty extraordinary – both the futility and the irrevocable wave of roadside bombs these men face on a daily basis. And yet this information was not translating back here. I found it to be both extraordinary and a really rich opportunity for film.

AC: It sounds like you perhaps had thoughts of doing a combat movie and then latched on to Boal's story for the specifics.

KB: It always comes from the characters. I tend not to work from genre in; it's character out. But that psychology that we just talked about - what would get you to take that long lonely walk? - that was what I wanted to understand.

AC: The film also shows that there are characters who respond to the situation in different ways but are equally effective.

KB: Equally effective, equally as courageous and as heroic.

AC: One's a cowboy, and one's more measured and cautious and sensible.

KB: Exactly. One is more tempered with caution; the other has no capacity for caution whatsoever.

AC: Although you've worked with several formulas or genres throughout your career, you always do them in your own way.

KB: Well, it all starts with the material. We were so lucky. The world of journalism is still a great window into our life experience.

AC: At least for however long our world of journalism continues to exist.

KB: It's an endangered species, like women directors.

AC: There's another question ... or several. Do you ever get tired of being cited as the only woman directing action movies or genre films. How does that sit with you?

KB: I don't think it's accurate, because I do think there are others out there. Also, I don't tend to think of labels or categories. I just think there are storytellers, and I don't think the telling of a story is gender-specific, unless it's reflexive.


AC: Yet the stories you choose to tell generally take place in a mostly male world.


KB: Again, I think it really starts from characters and a fascination with a particular character in this film. The face of bravery in the 21st century Army was really the way into this movie for me. Not from a standpoint of gender.


AC: Are you an adrenaline junkie yourself?

KB: I don't think of myself that way. I guess we're all in our material in some way, but I don't think it's a one-to-one relationship.




















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The 11th Hour

Writer/director Tim McCanlies eyes the finish line

Inside a screening room at the Austin Film Society, Tim McCanlies is busy finishing the sound mix on his latest feature, The 2 Bobs, which is set to premiere at this year's South by Southwest Film Festival. One row behind McCanlies is Danny Reisch, a local recording engineer and the film's sound supervisor. Reisch is working on a laptop on which the multicolored visual representation of the film's various audio components - dialogue, sound effects, musical score, etc. – scroll by.

Onscreen, a scene from the second reel of The 2 Bobs is playing. A man is standing at a podium before a small audience conducting either a self-help seminar or a sales demonstration of sex toys (no screener was made available to the Chronicle before I wrote this piece, so the details of the film's story are a bit murky). The camera cuts to a shot of the film's heroes – the two Bobs of the title, legendary video-game programmers who find themselves playing detectives after the software for their newest ultraviolent game is stolen and their livelihoods are put at risk - and their friends whispering to one another while the man on the podium continues to pontificate.

For two days, McCanlies and Reisch have been going through the film with a fine-tooth comb and a digital equalizer, raising and

lowering volumes so that vital bits of plot information come through and less vital bits CILAT STATE recede into the background, and cutting frequencies in the tone of certain actors' voices so they don't sound like they're speaking from inside a well. They watch and rewatch shots over and over again until the untrained ear becomes completely numb to the experience. But slowly and surely, with tweaks here and adjustments there, the sound of the film takes shape, conjuring through the use of reverb effects the sense of being in a large room or through the delicate dance of equalization knobs the cinematic simulacrum of real conversation. It's like Michelangelo freeing his sculptures from their

McCanlies (who also wrote and directed Secondhand Lions and Dancer, Texas Pop. 81) and Reisch get through a few minutes of screen time for every hour they spend mixing. Normally sound mixing on a feature takes about six weeks. The producers of The 2 Bobs have set aside five days.

marble prisons.

The scene changes, and now a large man named Horizontal Bob is making his way through an enormous warehouse, opening boxes filled with various sexual aids. He reaches into one box and pulls out what can only be described as an elaborate penis pump connected to a vacuum hose. When he turns it on, the device lets loose a thunderous sucking, wheezing sound before it latches onto Bob's pants, causing him to howl in pain, rip the machine from his crotch, and toss it away before it causes any real damage. After McCanlies has made sure that thunderous sound won't be quite as thunderous when the film screens for audiences, I ask Reisch, who was responsible for the movie's audio effects, just how he got that the giant sucking sound.

Well," he says, "there are a 🕏 lot of layers. First, for the clicking sound the pump makes when it turns on, we used a remote control on/off switch. Then there's

the initial sound of it turning on, which is a hair dryer - we wanted to get the effect of a small motor that's really struggling, a highpitch whine. Then we decided we wanted this nice, authoritative, painful thunk! right as the hose makes its connection to the outside of his trousers - which is a suction sound we created


by combining the sound of a small Shop-Vac as it gets caught in a carpet and goes into high gear with sounds from

> a computer effects library. And then we threw a telephone on the floor to get the right crashing sound. All told, there were at least six or seven different sounds we needed to create or find in order to get the sequence right."

That's no fewer than six different new recordings to get one sound sequence for about 15 seconds of screen time. To get through one particular three-minute stretch of The 2 Bobs, more than 250 sound effects had to be generated. And now they all need to be mixed.

And the movie premieres in two weeks.

At this year's SXSW Film Festival, more than 100 features and 100 shorts will be screening, and it's better than even money that most of them are under the same kind of last-minute, 11th-hour, mad-dash touching-up that The 2 Bobs is. Often, when a movie is sent to a festival for consideration, it's merely the rough draft of the movie it's going to be by the time it finally gets shown to audiences: Entire scenes are missing, a temporary score from some other movie is playing in the background, the sound is screwy, special effects are nonexistent, plots are implied, animated sequences are figments of the writer's imagination, the coloring is bad, the title cards and closing credits are pipe dreams, dramas may still be



comedies, and French films may yet become Korean films. So when word comes down that your movie's been accepted to a festival such as SXSW, that's when things suddenly become very, very real and very, very immediate.

"Having a hard deadline like we have with South by Southwest definitely focuses you," says McCanlies, "because suddenly you realize you can't tinker forever. We shot The 2 Bobs very fast - the shoot was only 35 days - but it wasn't until we got into South by Southwest that all the producers and the editor and everyone else working postproduction were like, 'Oh my god, we actually have to do this; we have to get this done.' And then they looked at their watches. It focused their minds, and it focused mine."

As I'm writing this, a small cottage industry, based almost entirely here in Austin, is grinding away to make sure The 2 Bobs is ready in time for its premiere: Sound is being mixed; a technician in Dallas is working on the film's color correction; composer Kaz Boyle is putting the final touches on the score; a trailer complete with voiceovers is being produced; posters are

being printed at Super! Alright! media studios on the city's Eastside: a small team of marketers and promoters is busy drumming up media and studio inter-

est and setting up the film's premiere and all kinds of pre- and post-parties. And then, to top things off, there's the elaborate, climactic, imperative five-minute computer-animated action sequence that closes out the film, which artists at Austin's Critical Mass Interactive production company are working 'round the clock to finish, if for no other reason than to make sure the other 81 minutes of The 2 Bobs weren't shot for nothing.

So with the deadline of an impending festival premiere comes a mad scramble, along with tension, concern, and anxiety. But I also wonder if there isn't some artistic value to a situation where time is the ultimate factor, if creativity isn't bumped up a notch or two under the strain of an impending hard deadline. Like reporters in old black-and-white screwball comedies, do humans work best when the clock is ticking?

"I think there's something to that idea," McCanlies says. "Adrenaline definitely kicks in when you're suddenly faced with a deadline, and that adrenaline can definitely be the source of ideas and creativity. I also think with a movie like The 2 Bobs, which is a little anarchic - it's wacky and crazy and fast-paced maybe the kind of manic postproduction we're doing is in keeping with the spirit of the movie. Sometimes when I'm writing a movie that's a fast-paced comedy, I write it faster. You need that momentum and pace and enthusiasm to maintain the right tone."

The director also believes that this downto-the-wire approach to filmmaking is served by his choice to employ mainly young Austin talent to be his collaborators, from Reisch

> to the programmers at CMI to the artists at Super! Alright!, most of whom are looking to prove themselves with a big-name filmmaker.

Monday, March 16, 6:30pm, Paramount "Somehow," McCanlies tells me, "it seems appropriate to be keep-

ing this manic schedule with all these young people around, working for very little money. They're a very hungry group of people. We can't write big checks, so people are doing this more for art and for the love of film and to show what they can do because they have something to prove. For them and for me, it's always been a passion project. And the energy that fuels passion projects is multiplied by the adrenaline that comes when you're fighting against the clock."



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
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
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
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The Bee's Knees

Andrew Bujalski's uncommon process

Andrew Bujalski shoots on film and edits on a Steenbeck, which makes him - or at least his process - something of a dinosaur in the current indie film climate. That means making movies for Bujalski may be more labor-intensive than for most, but it's working, for sure: His pictures, including Funny Ha Ha and Mutual Appreciation, are funny, affecting, but never affected. Where they really sing is in the space between the beats, in the seesawing intimacy and awkwardness that seem to attend all human interaction.

The Chronicle recently sat down with Bujalski over sandwiches at Avenue B Grocery to talk about his latest film, Beeswax, which world-premiered last month at the Berlinale film festival and features no fewer than six local directors in supporting parts, as well as South by Southwest Film Producer Janet Pierson (cast a couple of years before she signed on to the Fest). It follows two sisters (played by real-life twins Tilly and Maggie Hatcher), one who is drifting - away from a boyfriend, toward an overseas job - while the other tussles for control of a co-owned vintage shop in Austin.

Austin Chronicle: Where did the idea of Beeswax begin? Andrew Bujalski: I think the seed of all of my films, or at least with these three, has been beginning with imagining the person who was going to play the lead. For years I've had it in the back of my head that I'd like to do a film with the Hatcher sisters, who I've known for a long time. I met Maggie in college. She actually acted in a student film I did years ago. And shortly thereafter, I met her sister. Of course, they're both perfectly charismatic people, and the fact that they're twins makes it a supernova of charisma.

AC: So do all your charismatic friends sort of wait around for you to fashion a film around them?

AB: I don't know. There was a time in which I thought that half my friends were mad at me for putting them in a film, and half my friends were mad at me for not putting them in a film. But I don't worry about it too much.

AC: You have, I think, six different Austin directors acting in the film. Is that uncomfortable for you at all to have other directors on set?

AB: Not particularly. ... I think, generally speaking, directors often have great instincts as actors.

So I was just tapping into that. It's nice that - certainly these people in particular - they have everything I want from a nonactor, which is that you know they're kind of necessarily going to explore a scene organically and not fall back on any kind of training as actors, but they also know what we're doing, there's familiarity with the process. Which maybe makes finding that comfort level a little quicker, a little easier.

AC: I thought it was interesting this was your first film you haven't acted in. I interviewed Alex Karpovsky last week for his film Trust Us, This Is All Made Up [see "The Watchmen," p.60], and he said he'd had his suspicions that the role he played was one you had written for yourself. He said you flatly denied it.

AB: I continue to flatly deny it.

AC: Why did you choose not to act in this one?

AB: I didn't feel like I had anything to give to it as an actor. Certainly when I was looking at other people for the role and especially now in retrospect, I look at what Alex was able to do with the role, and I don't think I could have brought that or anything better.

When I acted in Funny Ha Ha, it was pretty new to me, and there was something I could give to that character. And in Mutual Appreciation, I thought I could give something different as an actor, and I tried to. I feel like I pretty well found my range, and that's it. And I didn't want to act again unless I thought I had something new to give.

AC: So you shot on film, you edited on a Steenbeck, and it was fully scripted, right? Or was there improvisation on set?

AB: I don't know what standards people are judging by. And I tend to fall back on this philosophical notion that all acting is improvisation in some sense. I guess when people ask that question, what they mean is, "Are the words coming out of their mouths the words exactly as they're written on the page?" I've never done a word-to-word analysis. I know it's not 100 percent, but I know it's some percent. And probably a larger percent than most people seem to want it to be.

AC: What do you mean "seem to want it to be"?

AB: I guess it often feels like when that question is asked, people seem to want one or the other – they either want Shakespeare-slash-David Mamet precision, or they want everybody to be making it up. And it's hard to explain that it's more complicated

AC: I have no ulterior motives with that question.

AB: [Laughs] Sorry.

AC: No, it was more a question of the time-intensiveness of those elements. How long has the process been in making Beeswax?

AB: It was almost exactly George Bush's second term. We realized that when we were watching the

first finished print of the film during the inauguration, and the lights came up in the screening room, and we looked at our watches, and I kind of realized that I pretty much started this exactly four years ago.

Mutual Appreciation we premiered at South by Southwest in March of '05, and that was when I was starting to dream up this thing. ... I was living in Boston, and we were starting to talk about



where should we shoot this, and there was no obvious place. I lived in Boston, the girls at that time lived in Atlanta and New Haven, and I was working with the same producers I'd worked with in the past, who were in New York and L.A. ... So we talked about other places, and of all the other cities that kind of got thrown out there. Austin was the only one that really made any kind of sense, because I had lived here before, and so I did have a sense of plugging into the community – it's not like we were going to show up in town and not know anything or anybody.

And one of the things that really did it was I came down here for a week to scout locations. I needed a wheelchair-accessible vintage-clothing store. My whole script depended on that ... and they're really hard to come by. Vintage stores are usu-



ally very cramped places, and that's part of their charm, but I started to panic a little bit, because I thought I had written something that doesn't exist. ...

So I spent a week driving around Austin. I went to every vintage store you could find. And the last place I walked in the door was Storyville on 51st and Duval, and it was eerily right on. It was so much how I had written it, down to there being this sort of back room behind the counter, which is what I had written. And the counters were low, so it also made sense that someone in a wheelchair would be back there. ... So that more than anything seemed like a sign from God that we should be here.

AC: A lot of people have remarked upon how, well, un-remarkedupon in the movie it is, the fact that Jeannie [played by Tilly Hatcher is in a wheelchair – it's just a very comfortable-seeming lens into her world. Did she help you craft the character?

AB: Obviously, she was a great technical adviser. ... The only scene where quote-unquote disability is really kind of a significant, or foregrounded, factor is the scene where she's in the car and she realizes her chair's in the trunk. And that came from me asking her about nonobvious situations, and that was sort of an idea she put in my head.

But yeah, you know, when you're working with somebody who that's her daily life, it was something that all of us working on the film quickly got accustomed to. ... It was just a reality that was part of the film. But I know also, going into it, I talked to Tilly about - I think we were both excited about the idea of doing a film with a character with a disability that's not about the disability – that that's something you don't see that much. So that was a fun thing for us to try to do.



Magnificent Obsession

Charting the unlikely ascension of 'Troll 2' from crappiest movie ever made to cult darling

If you've never seen Claudio Fragasso's 1990 film Troll 2, stop reading this, go rent it from your favorite indie video store, watch it, recover from the experience (if you can), and then come back here. Seriously: Go. Now.

Michael Paul Stephenson, as you now know, starred as 10-year-old Joshua in Troll 2, a film so jaw-droppingly, mind-searingly bad that it has, over time, become the Citizen

Kane of crappy filmmaking Ed Wood's iconic Plan 9 From Outer Space as the most endearingly incompetent film ever made. Best Worst Movie, Stephenson's documentary on Troll 2's unlikely transformation from unrentable VHS shelfwarmer to genuine cult film with a fanatically devoted fan base, is a hoot, and it goes a long way toward explaining why, while a lot of films are just plain bad, a tiny handful – and Troll 2 in particular – rise above their gutter status to become, against all odds, genuinely

entertaining mistakes of cinematic nature. Like the carny's fake-bearded lady and the alligator boy with the obvious zipper running up his back, freak shows such as Troll 2 (and Best Worst Movie) succeed and survive via the only real thing they've got going for them: heart and the delusion of 24-framesper-second excellence.

"I think the biggest thing that attracted attention to Troll 2," says Stephenson, "is that it's genuine and sincere. It was never the director's intention to make a so-badit's-good type of movie. Claudio came to America and made the film he wanted to

make exactly the way he wanted to make it, and, as actors in the film, that was what our understanding was. We were expecting this to be a good horror film."

Of course, with an all-Italian, non-Englishspeaking crew directing a cast of inexperienced Yank pseudo-actors in Utah, the resulting film - which, it must be said, is devoid of trolls - was bound to be, um, fasci-

nating, but no one involved in the production, least of all Stephenson, expected the inane train wreck that was the film's final cut.

"Growing up, I was dreadfully embarrassed about *Troll* 2 and never even wanted to think about it. I remember I would shudder when I went into video stores with friends because I was terrified that we would come across my movie. I just hated it."

So how did Stephenson finally learn to embrace his inner (and outer) troll?

"I started getting MySpace messages from fans of the

movie, one or two, here and there," he explains. "At first I thought it was some kind of joke, but then someone sent me a photo of a Troll 2 fan party where they had dressed up and made all of these green desserts and food. I remember just staring and staring at the picture and thinking, "Why?!" These people made all this stuff, clearly enjoyed the movie, and they all looked so incredibly happy. Two days after that, I woke up in bed, turned to my wife, and said, 'I'm the star of the worst movie ever made.' And I was pretty happy about it. So, in short, it was the fans and their genuine love for the film that won me over to my own film."

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The Watchmen

Three documentaries shine a light on playing to the audience

At first glance, documentaries about a prison rodeo, a viral-video sensation, and two improv actors don't seem to have much cross section. But look closer, and there's something of a shared fascination in aspects of performance, in subjects who play to audiences of the hundreds, the thousands, and sometimes unintentionally.

Bradley Beesley's film Sweethearts of the Prison Rodeo follows the debut of women bull-riders in the Oklahoma State Prison's long-running rodeo, which puts inmates on a very public stage and gives them a reprieve from the 364 other days of the year spent behind bars. Ben Steinbauer's Winnebago Man documents his attempts to track down Jack Rebney, also known over the World Wide Web as "the angriest man in the world" due to leaked outtakes of his attempts to film a commercial for Winnebago in the Eighties (during which Rebney has something of an oncamera meltdown, swearing and sweating buckets, berating himself and his crew, and generally falling to pieces). And Alex Karpovsky's *Trust Us, This Is All Made Up*, which features a show by improv artists T.J. Jagodowski and Dave Pasquesi (see "T.J. & Dave," the Arts, p.37), expands the traditional performance piece by exploring the process itself.

The Chronicle recently sat down for drinks with the three filmmakers, as well as Beesley's editor and producer, Louisiana Kreutz, to talk about how their films came to be and what it's like making movies in Austin.

Austin Chronicle: So the reason why I wanted to sort of roundtable this with all of

Bradley Beesley: [Laughs] We were wondering about that.

AC: Well, they all seem to involve, in some way, the idea of playing to an audience. Alex, your film is the one that's straight up about a performance and is filmed in front of an audience, but there are actually no cutaway shots to the audience.

Ben Steinbauer: [To Alex Karpovsky] Whoa. That's interesting. Why did you choose that? Alex Karpovsky: Well, we had a camera for audience shots. It looked gay. It looked stupid. [Everybody laughs.]

Steinbauer: It was like a Chris Rock special or something? Karpovsky: Yeah, it

felt very familiar, packaged and overproduced. I didn't like the way it sat with me. It wasn't a big theoretical decision.

ELATING SUR Beesley: We did a test screening [on Sweethearts of the Prison Rodeo], and some of the feedback was, "We want more audience." So we went back through and added more.

AC: You mean at the actual rodeo, they wanted more reaction shots?

Beesley: Sure. And I think you know in some of the frames we cheat reality with when they're cheering. But it's interesting to see the mass of humanity, to see, as you say, this gladiator event.

Louisiana Kreutz: It's a strange mix of people that have family members in the rodeo or family members that work in the prison. ... And then you also have spectators who just want to see these inmates get fucked up.

Beesley: Ben actually [was on the crew] and didn't get to see the rodeo because his camera was on the audience.

Steinbauer: That's right. So I've seen the audience. And to add to that, the weirdest

part for me, the prison aside – it's like going to the fair. I'm from Oklahoma and Kansas. and I'm used to this idea of "bring the whole town together." But the fact that they're watching inmates and there are guys with shotguns and there's barbed wire everywhere combined with the kid eating funnel cake who has stuff all over his face was so intense, the contrast. ...

And one of the saddest scenes, I think - [to Kreutz] and you did a really good job cutting this - that the kids were going and reaching through the cages to touch their moms. There was some painful, heart-wrenching interaction going on.

> Kreutz: But that was a positive moment. ... All the women

were beaming, showing off their country outfits, as opposed to their prison uniforms.

Beesley: One of the shots that Ben got, which is one of my favorite shots in the movie, was of this little boy Casey. His mom is Crystal, and she's behind

the razor wire, and he's the one reaching and waving. She hadn't seen him since he was 19 days old, because the dad decided, "Well, we don't want this kid to watch his mom grow up in prison."

AC: Ben, in your film, there's a scene in which you're with Jack Rebney, and you're pushing really hard to take him to buy a camera so he can film himself. And in that moment, I felt really uncomfortable and kind of angry with you. I didn't realize until later that you were just trying to be proactive about helping him get

Steinbauer: It's been real interesting in the editing process. ... We've gotten lots of comments about people not liking me; they think that I'm a dick. ... And actually, I don't mind that. Because what ends up happening is this really interesting thing, that Jack Rebney looks like a dick in the beginning, in the clip, and





the movie humanizes him, and I sort of do the reverse. ... And in the end, we both sort of have this nice moment. ... I had to take the fall a little bit, too, if I was honestly going to make a film about a guy who is sort of known as being a classical fool.

Beesley: I never knew you'd gotten that feedback.


Steinbauer: Oh veah, we've heard that a lot. And I was doing what he said he wanted – he wanted to clear his name and reach this audience. He's known by millions of people on YouTube, so I was like, "Let's get you a camera and set it up for you, and I'll post it for you on YouTube, and you can have your say and fight back." And that's perceived in the movie as [if] I'm trying to make him do a diary cam for, like, The Real World. The audience doesn't trust my intentions. They don't think I have his best interests at heart. Which is interesting, 'cause, I mean, I sincerely did. I know that



sounds maybe naive to say, but I was really trying to help him. But that's actually worked out great that it's not perceived that way.


AC: That's interesting that you become a character in your film. I'm wondering what that's like in the editing process. And Alex, you were in your first film [the narrative feature The Hole Storyl.

Karpovsky: It took me a year and a half to edit [The Hole Story] just because I kept shooting it. editing it, reshooting it. I just kept going back upstairs to the bathroom and reshooting a scene. And it became kind of a crazy thing. I was doing it all by myself in my parents' house in suburban Boston. It was not a pleasant process. I didn't have fun for most of it. And then finally I just lost it and asked my friend to step in and pick up the broken pieces. So I actually didn't finish editing the movie. I tried to. I think I got it into decent shape, but I couldn't carry that corpse over the CONTINUED ON P.62

finish line. I needed someone with fresh eyes and a different face. ... I realized I was making decisions based on vanity and narcissism rather than what was good for the movie. And sometimes I'd notice it, and sometimes I wouldn't, but ultimately it became a problem.

Beesley: But how could you not?

Karpovsky: It was hard. And I don't want to do it again.

Beesley: Well, it's interesting, Ben, that you found an editor.

Steinbauer: I had to. There was no way I could edit it, in a similar fashion to [Karpovsky], I think. Especially once I became a character, I just knew I had no perspective. It had been kind of a traumatic shoot for me, and so I couldn't look at the footage. I have too many associations. ... One of the most pivotal scenes in the movie, my pants are slouching so far down, it looks like I have pooped my pants. I have a hole in my sweater – I look horrible.

It's been one of these things where the more I'm exposed to it, I become desensitized. Now that we're about to show it to a lot of people, I'm starting to get nervous again. But once I had an editor come in, I forgot about it for a while, which was nice.

AC: It sounds like you had to put a lot of time into crafting a relationship with Rebney. Alex, your shoot was just a couple of days. Did you have a pre-existing relationship with T.J. and Dave?

Karpovsky: No, and I didn't know that much about improv to begin with. I just saw a show of theirs in New York; a friend dragged me to it. Most of the improv that I was exposed to before these guys was really not that good. It made me feel embarrassed for the performers. AC: It's an awful feeling.

Karpovsky: It's a horrible feeling, which is a testament to how difficult it is to pull off. It's a really hard thing to do – especially for an hour, which is what these guys do, with no audience suggestions, no scene breaks – they just go for an hour. It's really hard.

So my friend dragged me to the show, and I went, and it was like a pseudo-mystical experience. It blew me away and made me think about all sorts of things - the underpinnings of human imagination and creativity and what these guys' relationship, their dynamic, was offstage. It made me really curious.

But there was never really a point when I felt: There's a movie here. There's a constant uncertainty as to whether or not this will be interesting. It still is. It'll be answered in a week or two, of whether or not people respond to it. You know, the basic challenge of the movie is: How do [you translate] this fundamentally 3-D theatrical live experience into a cinematic 2-D experience? I think it's generally tricky to do, and that was sort of the challenge and the source of enthusiasm for me.



And what I told Dave was, if we had 15 to 30 minutes before the show starts to create some kind of context, I think we have a chance to pull it off. A few basic models, even though they're very different, is My Dinner With Andre, which is basically a performance film in the sense that it's just a conversation. But there's a buildup to it - they walk around, and there's a voiceover for 10 minutes. I think without that, the movie wouldn't work. ... And also Swimming to Cambodia, which is also a performance film, but again, it doesn't start with Spalding Gray in the theatre - it starts with him walking around with a voiceover, which again I think is crucial.

Beesley: Because it hooks you in?

Karpovsky: It makes you get some basic read for who this person is. Hopefully this person is interesting, and it allows you to want to know more of him, and more of him in a different light than the one you've just been exposed to. In [Trust Us] I try to explore their relationship and their friendship, then hopefully you're interested in that, and you see how that translates and transforms to them being onstage together.

AC: What about you, Bradley – where did Prison Rodeo start for you?

Beesley: I think being a kid, growing up in Oklahoma, reading about the rodeo [in the papers]. Kind of being a suburbanite and creating your own narrative of what you think this rodeo is or could be. And then I was living in San Francisco in 2006, and I read some Washington Post article that said this is the first time females get to participate, and I thought: "Fuck it - I'm booking a ticket. I'm finally going to do this." So I got on a flight the next day. We shot for a day, and I was fucking scared, first of all. High-max-security prison. But also, like, "What am I doing here?

I don't know why, but if I hear that you have a prison documentary, I'm automatically not gonna want to watch it. ... They're just so overdone and so cliché, especially on television – it's just not a topic that appeals to me. So I was going into it jaded. Like, "I'm just gonna go with my cameras just to shoot this event that's somewhat novel."

[To Karpovsky] You were saying you didn't know when it was going to be a film – I knew exactly. The first interviews were with Danny [one of the inmate bull-riders], and I had no idea he was going to become a main character. And he was talking about, "Just because you've killed in prison doesn't mean you're a murderer." And we're thinking, "Really?" Technically speaking. I think maybe it does. And then we kind of left the interview, because we shot the interview before we shot any of the rodeo, and my dad was there, and I [told him], "This is kind of creepy being in this prison, and these people are murderers, and I don't know if I want to be associated with them – like, I don't know if I want to spend three years of my life [on this project]."

And then you see this guy Danny get on the bull, and all of a sudden, you're like supertense. He only rides for three seconds, but after that, he comes back, and I'm like high-fiving and hugging him. And I caught myself mid all this, and I'm like, "Oh my God,

this guy has killed someone." ... And I'm like: "Eh, I don't care. I'm caught up; I'm into it." So that's when I knew. You get caught up in the emotion. Maybe I'm just too big of a sap. AC: So Bradley and Ben, you worked on each other's movies, and Alex, you've acted in a bunch of local people's films. I'm just curious how you feel about the Austin film community. Can we call you one of our own yet, Alex?

Karpovsky: I hope you can. I love it here. I've only been here a year and a half or so. ... I've lived in New York the last nine years. I never liked New York. I was there because my friends were there and there were some vague notions of opportunity there. But it's always a struggle to keep up financially. I get overwhelmed and anxious there very easily. I get claustrophobic there.

Beesley: This is a good place for you then.

Karpovsky: Yeah, it is.

AC: Why did you come down?

Karpovsky: For Andrew [Bujalski]'s movie [see "The Bee's Knees," p.58]. And I had no intention of staying. But I just really loved Austin and wanted a break from New York at the same time. And [The Order of Myths director| Margaret Brown - her apartment was freeing up. So she went to New York and ...

Steinbauer: You lived in Margaret's old place? We lived right around the corner from there.

Karpovsky: Oh really? I now live at [Austin filmmaker | Heather Courtney's place, right around the corner from here. But I loved that neighborhood. Heather's in Afghanistan now.

Beesley: Is she still alive?

Karpovsky: Well, I got an e-mail a week ago. Steinbauer: I saw [Austin filmmaker] Lisa Kaselak a couple of nights ago, and she had just gotten back from shooting something separately in Afghanistan, and they ran into each other on a base.

Beesley: No way.

Steinbauer: And they had no idea the other was there. She said it was the weirdest thing - they were shooting, and they literally almost backed into each other.

AC: What about you guys? You've pretty much signed on to Austin, right?


Steinbauer: You make it sound so ominous. Yeah, I love it here. It seems really, um – easy is maybe too reductive or simple of a word - but it's just like this [gestures around the table]. I mean, Alex, you needed a place; you found someone who had a place. You meet other filmmakers - it's like, everything in Austin happens that way. I have an anecdote: We were looking for a poster designer for this movie - the one we had wasn't working out. We went to Margaret Brown's afterparty, and we met this friend of a friend who, turns out, does illustrations for The New Yorker and This American Life in exactly the style that we'd been looking at that afternoon, thinking maybe we could find someone to do this. And it just naturally appeared. I have that experience over and over again in Austin. It seems like, as long that keeps happening, there's no reason to leave.

Two takes on the bromance, indie vs. studio

STRAIGHT MALE SEEKS SAME 'Humpday'

Humpday is not your typical love story. In fact, it's not a love story at all. It's a like story at best: an awkward like story. College friends Ben and Andrew reunite after years of traveling their own paths. Ben made his way to a wife and a 9-to-5 job, while Andrew has traveled the world exploring more artistic avenues. An evening of drinking leads to a pact that in turn leads to a game of anal-sex chicken that dominates the film's action.

Insecurity with the characters' respective lots leads to a mutual agreement to make a soft-porn film starring the old (and straight) friends. Sounds unbelievable? In the capable hands of director Lynn Shelton and actors Mark Duplass and

Joshua Leonard, the final product is a thoroughly convincing piece of expected awkwardness and unexpected humor. Case in point: Ben and Andrew face off and struggle for dominance on the basketball court. The scene is both dramatic and hilarious, because the tension is palpable, but the basketball playing is laughably abysmal. Shelton assures me that this is not a far cry from the abilities of the actors themselves.

Actors have always come first for Shelton, who talked to us from her home in Seattle, and this film started in a similar manner to last year's Sheltondirected South by Southwest premiere, My Effortless Brilliance: with a premise and an actor in mind. She began Humpday with a desire to explore how even platonic relationships can sap individual identity and with Duplass in mind as the lead. "It doesn't mean it's a one-character movie," says Shelton. "It just means that everything gets cast around that person and spirals out."

From there, Shelton and Duplass began thoroughly defining characters with expansive backstories and establishing scenes and story arcs to give the scriptless shoot clear direction. "I really like structure and to know exactly what's going to happen ... how each scene is going to feed into the next," explains Shelton. Add to the flexible script work a

bare-bones shooting style (often with Shelton holding the second camera) and protagonists

born of the individuals playing them, and an endearing and naturalistic film emerges. A

film populated with highly identifiable people putting themselves into awkward positions that feel less out of the ordinary than they should.

> The finished product became difficult to categorize. The premise was comedic, but dramatic elements reared their heads often. There were no proper jokes, and the actors played everything straight. "I didn't know it was going to be a comedy until Sundance," says Shelton. The big laughs from Park City and the new title of "comedic director" made Shelton honey to the Hollywood bees. Managers calling her a female Judd



Apatow or pushing the script for the next Seth Rogen vehicle made Shelton cautious of the studio system. "I'm hoping to have one of those two-tiered careers," clarifies Shelton, "where I can open myself up to more commercial possibilities without losing my integrity but still be able to make films on the scale that I like."

However, a \$20 million budget means more problems and stress for a less-is-more filmmaker. "I didn't start making movies this way because it was the only way I could afford to," Shelton says. "It just turns out that this way of working -[which is] going to make the work better - is also affordable. It's a happy coincidence."

Surrounding herself with cast and crew whom Shelton knows and can have fun with is paramount. The setup for most of Humpday's shooting feels more like a house party with a set upstairs and editing room and greenroom in the basement. Just add a keg, and Humpday's bromance is complete. "Making movies is too hard for it to be an unpleasant experience," says Shelton. "When it's fun, there's nothing more fun than making something creative with a group of people. It's like drama camp or something." – James Renovitch

BREAKING THE BUDDY MOVIE MOLD 'I Love You, Man'

Continuing its recent trend of showcasing some of the smartest comedies to come out of Hollywood, this year's South by Southwest Film Festival will open with John Hamburg's unique buddy comedy, I Love You, Man (which opens in theatres nationwide March 20). In it Paul Rudd plays Peter, an affable real estate agent who proposes to his girlfriend

(played by Rashida Jones) but can't find a best man for the big day due to his lack of guy friends. This leads Peter on a string of "man dates" which go horribly awry - that is, until he meets Sydney (Jason Segel), a likable loner who builds such a tight bond with Peter it begins to affect his engagement.

No stranger to awkward comedies - his debut feature was the now-cult-favorite Safe Men, and he penned the Meet the Parents franchise and directed Along Came Polly - Hamburg believes his latest has

a more realistic feel than his pervious work. "It's pretty easy to get friends when you're in high school or college because you're all stuck together," he says. "But when you get out of college, you go on your own path, and there's no easy way to meet people. I do think a lot of

people in their 20s and 30s wake up one day and go, 'What the hell happened?' I thought that was very fertile ground for a comedy.'

Hamburg first caught wind of the script about six years ago, back when "bromance" and "BFF" weren't in the popular lexicon. Producer Donald De Line bought the spec script written by TV scribe Larry Levin, then



titled Let's Make Friends, for Hamburg to direct. But feeling he wasn't ready, Hamburg passed, and the script fell in and out of screenwriters' and directors' hands for years, with the plot changing back and forth from a guy needing to find a best man to a guy wanting to make friends after moving to a new city. Then, in 2007, Hamburg felt he was ready. Going with the best-man premise, he reworked the script, setting it in L.A.; created a new cast of characters; and sprinkled in his own popculture guy obsessions, like his love for the band Rush and casting Lou Ferrigno (yes, the Incredible Hulk), who in the movie hires Peter to sell his house, which is filled with Hulk memorabilia and a life-size bronze statue of Ferrigno on the back lawn.

"One of the first scenes I wrote was Peter and Sydney bonding over Rush, and I thought having a montage of them getting to know each other jamming to a Rush song would be perfect." And Ferrigno? "That was just 100 percent random," Hamburg admits. "In L.A. you run into famous people all the time – at the dry cleaners, at Whole Foods. I thought it would be cool if [Peter] was selling Lou Ferrigno's house." (Lest he be pummeled by Ferrigno when he sees him again, Hamburg adds that the house in the film isn't really Ferrigno's.)

Even though Hamburg has major stars like Ben Stiller on speed dial, he thought Rudd and Segel, both known better for their supporting roles, would be perfect to play the leads. "Paul and Jason are at this level of fame where they have huge followings, but some people have never heard of them," he explains. "I love that, because audiences can get lost in their characters a little more." And with their improvisational talents, Hamburg let them riff when the scenes called for it. In a bar scene, for example, where Peter and Sydney first get to know each other, Hamburg let the two improvise the scene, capturing hilarious moments of the two discussing hybrid cars vs. hybrid animals and marveling over how much Andre the Giant could consume before getting drunk, ending with Segel delivering a perfect Andre the Giant impersonation.

I Love You, Man doesn't play like a predictable buddy movie; Hamburg thinks that's because Hollywood is currently finding success in comedies with genuine stories, the chances he takes in his movie are possible. "I think there's a movement, with Judd Apatow being the leader, of making comedies that seem a little more real and off-the-cuff," he says. "We're seeing that if a movie's funny and connects with people, anything goes." - Jason Guerrasio

Found Film

The rehatching of Tobe Hooper's 1969 debut, 'Eggshells'

Tobe Hooper's first film, Eggshells, released a half decade before The Texas Chainsaw Massacre, has long been considered a lost film, with there being little hope that a print would surface. The film has attracted attention because it is Tobe Hooper's first film, as well as that of his co-writer, Kim Henkel, and because, by all accounts, it is very much a slice of life and rare record of Austin circa 1968. Against all odds, a print has surfaced. Eggshells will be shown for probably the first time in close to four decades at the South by Southwest Film Festival 09.

In 1974 The Texas Chainsaw Massacre was blood going down the drain at the end being released. The film had a profound impact on most future horror films, though that statement is often misinterpreted to mean that the film featured unprecedented violence and gore. In point of fact, it didn't, and its influence was in different directions. George Romero's Night of the Living Dead, released in 1968, was much gorier and more violent, as was Wes Craven's The Last House on the Left, released in 1972. By 1974, Herschell Gordon Lewis had released Blood Feast (1963), Two Thousand Maniacs! (1964), and Color Me Blood Red (1965), among other films. Given the time they were released, it is still hard to tell how gory Lewis' films were perceived to be; they seemed to me, having come to them much later, as comic as horrifying, with such an excess of fake blood and two-dimensional gore. But had I seen

them at the time, who knows how I would have reacted? It was probably 1969 or 1970 when I saw Night of the Living Dead, which freaked me out more than any film I had seen previously.

Innovative or unusually manipulative point of view - what the camera sees and how and when it sees it - is often the deciding factor as to the power of imagination, both the filmmaker's and the audience's, in creating tension/terror in a horror film. Horror film masterpieces almost invariably boast brilliant points of view as one of their determining characteristics. Robert Wise's The Haunting, released in 1963, has almost no gore but is a powerfully terrifying film (not to be confused with the mediocre remake). Well into the early 1980s, I would program it in different film series. In many ways the film had dated so that audiences would start out laughing at it. Wise's use of POV and overall mise-en-scène, though, always had them screaming at the end.

In classic Hitchcock the terror almost always came more from the way scenes are constructed than from gore. The perfect example is the shower scene in Psycho, where the editing creates an overwhelming visceral reaction to the point where many people over the years insisted to me that the scene was in color, with the



bright red. The film is in black and white.

Part of the genius of Jonathan Demme's Silence of the Lambs is his use of remarkable point-of-view shots. He creates a disorienting visual poetry through POV and editing.

Many people remember The Texas Chainsaw Massacre, as said above, as being far more violent and gory than what is actually shown in the film. The film's brilliance and influence lie in the way that Tobe Hooper begins to evoke a sense of tension in the audience from close to the very beginning (the title certainly aiding in this effort), a tension that ratchets up and up as the film progresses. Some of the most horrifying shots or terrifying moments have much more to do with cinema than with gore or violence. The film is a masterpiece of manipulation through

camera movement, sound, POV, the set, the actors, and editing. Bees buzzing in a hive are as scary as

that Hooper's vision and sense of cinema were in place long before Chainsaw.

Eggshells makes explicit what many have long assumed - that Hooper's sense of cinema is the defining characteristic that makes Chainsaw great. Eggshells is a true 1968 film, psychedelic and political; it seems clear that Hooper had watched more than a film or two by Jean-Luc Godard. The film celebrates alternative lifestyles and politics and people and an odd, kinky semimysticism that is grounded more in humor than the supernatural. It captures what Austin looked like in the Sixties as well as the political sensibility shared by so many at the time.

As a period piece and/or as a psychedelic film and/or as a first effort by a gifted director, the film is well worth watching. But there is something more going on. Throughout Eggshells are the kinds of telltale camera movements, manipulations of POV, casually intricate cutting, and scenes that are mystify-

> ing and haunted, elements that all come to fruition in Chainsaw, where they harmoniously work together to create that horror film masterpiece.

The film is even more cinematic than one might expect. There are moments of classic psychedelic cutting and colors. Hooper's sense of odd humor, especially used as an unusual punctuation mark, is very evident. Eggshells above all else is fun to watch.

In the pages of the Chronicle, a number of us on rare occasions cite Ed Lowry, one of the Chronicle's founders and the head of CinemaTexas, who was in so many ways, though only a fellow graduate student, our most important teacher when we were graduate students in the Radio-Television-Film Department at the University of Texas. Ed died in 1985. Over the years we've all missed him a surprising amount of the time. Over the years, however, after viewing some truly unique and/or powerful and/or idiosyncratic and/or historically important film, I miss Ed in the way an amputee misses a limb. I miss him because I want to talk to him, but I also need to talk to him, but usually, most of all, because I know how much he would love the film in question. If ever there were an Ed Lowry film in my life, Eggshells is it.

films. Robert Burns' furniture and wall dressings in the house are beyond unsettling. Almost languid tracking shots end up evoking fear in just their pacing. Four years after Chainsaw, John Carpenter upped the ante in Halloween (1978), where the horror could be anywhere and was everywhere, but he

There were many extraordinary talents that worked on Chainsaw, including cinematographer Daniel Pearl; Hooper's co-writer, Kim Henkel; art and production designer Robert Burns; and Wayne Bell doing sound. Even though, in so many ways, it is clearly a director's movie in that all the elements are used to build tension and create horror. Hooper's talent has always been clear, but just how much of the film was his vision and how much was his coordinating others' contributions has never been readily apparent. Eggshells illuminates

An Expanding **Definition of Family**

Karen Skloss' personal documentary explores mothers and daughters and the choices they make

"You're endangering yourself and the child," 9-year-old Jasmine Harrison parrots in her deepest bass after a golfer chides her and her mother for lounging in the grass at Hancock Golf Course. Jasmine is one of the main subjects of Sunshine, a documentary directed by and featuring her mother, Austinite Karen Skloss. A former film student at the University of Texas, Skloss didn't realize a decade ago that she'd be premiering a personal documentary some day. "I wanted to make narratives," she explains, but she began editing documentary shorts for Ellen Spiro (Body of War) just after Jasmine was born and became drawn to the medium. And it doesn't hurt that Skloss' life could be the premise of a Lifetime original movie - if Lifetime original movies were interesting.

In 1975, there was a house tucked away on West Campus where young women went to disappear for the duration of an unplanned pregnancy. This house, Marywood, was where Skloss' life began. Coming from a high-profile family in small-town Texas, Skloss' biological mother, Mary Tinsley, felt like Marywood was her only option when she became pregnant at 19. The women who got pregnant "in her community would disappear. And if they kept

> the baby, they probably never came back, and it was a shameful thing," Skloss explains. So she understood the courage it took for Tinsley to reunite with her two decades later, and when Skloss unexpectedly became pregnant herself in 1999, it was "a karma thing. ... How could I be blasé about the fact that the same

thing happened to me?"

In the beginning, however, Sunshine wasn't the story of Tinsley's and Skloss' pregnancies. It began with the fear that Jasmine's father, Jeremy Harrison, was going to move away. Unlike her mother, who gave Skloss up for adoption, Skloss and Harrison decided "to split everything 50-50; we did it on a hand-

shake, we didn't go to court, and we didn't get along. ... It was like this vow." With equally shared parenting duties, Skloss didn't quite feel like a single mother, so when she felt the parenthood she and Harrison had created "was going to disintegrate right before [her] geves," she began making a film about

single parenting to deal with the change.

Skloss began creating a series of video portraits featuring single mothers and fathers in the Single Parent Resource Network, a local community group that creates "a little village to raise the child." At first, "the idea was that I'd take Jasmine to all of the shoots with me, and we'd be the little film crew, the singlemom-with-child-in-tow film crew that knocks over the camera sometimes and makes it

imperfect, but it was really about gathering all of these other people's stories."

But the focus of the film shifted when Harrison didn't leave, and as Skloss filmed, "the whole process of dealing with it and trying to think about it made me get really introspective about my past." The emotional weight of Skloss' experience overshadowed other parents' stories, and the evolution of the family unit that Skloss saw in her own story became an overarching theme. In Austin in





Two of my favorite women animators, Signe Baumane and Sarah Jane Lapp, will have new short films at South by Southwest. Baumane is the 45-year-old wild and quirky Latvian in NYC whose signature outré oeuvre of colorful hand-drawn animations, many of which she herself narrates, have ranged from "Teat Beat of Sex" to her "Five Informercials for Dentists." Her new 12-minute short, "Birth," is about the surreal psychological terrors of a pregnant teen, a fairly serious tale told with fairly humorous, or at least humorously surreal, imagery. Lapp, on the other hand, is a 36-year-old Seattlebased Renaissance woman visual artist and filmmaker ("Chronicles of an Asthmatic Stripper"), who typically takes on more abstract and cerebral subjects in her finely rendered hand-drawn "experimental animations," as with her new 24-minute short, "Chronicles of a Professional Eulogist." Narrated by a eulogist in training, the film is about a dying professional eulogist's search for a protégé to inherit the glorious burden of his profession. The semifictional film, which Lapp describes as a "documation," uses the imagined figure of the professional eulogist to explore the function of memory, place, and social nostalgia in our religious imaginations.

Here are some of their comments about their chosen form. Baumane replied from the stands at a soccer game in Milan, Italy, where she's working on a commission, while Lapp got in touch in between deadlines for the political op art she creates for a Seattle daily and the small dance troupe she's managing.



Austin Chronicle: Why do you animate? **Signe Baumane:** I just fell into animation without much thought. ... Now, of course, I look back and wonder why. Animation does have a visual surreal appeal and is able to deal with symbolic meanings without getting too obvious or cheesy. With just one stroke in animation, I am able to express a complicated thought that liveaction wouldn't be able to address ... but I can't work with a character in depth or express nuanced psychological reality. It's just me; I can't do it. ... My drawing style is too simple, and I am drawn too much to abstraction in animation and to the bizarre, surreal, and philosophical. (I have a [Bachelor of Arts] degree in philosophy, so I think too much for my own good.) **AC**: Are your stories autobiographical?

SB: Well, we all talk about what we know, so in that sense, all my work is very autobiographical. Until recently it was not very clear to me what my main subject was. Some would say sex, but that's only the most scandalous, visible topic. It is clear to me now that what I am interested in is the relationship of the human body and the human spirit. AC: Isn't "Birth" a more serious film than you usually make?

SB: "Veterinarian" was my first serious film, about a vet with a broken heart. I knew how to make audiences laugh, and I wanted to see if I could make them cry – range of emotions have to be explored. I didn't intend for "Birth" to be a serious film, initially, and am still not sure if it is totally serious.

Austin Chronicle: You work in so many media, do certain stories lend themselves to animation?

Sarah Jane Lapp: Personally, I find it difficult to animate materials which don't "resonate" with me. Other than that, I don't have limitations. I'd like to say that if you can draw it, you can animate it. But for me, that's not really true. I trained among a bevy of formerly oppressed Czechs, so I suppose I tend to think that angst animates well, politi-

1999, "the single mother was no big deal, but for [Mary], especially in her community at the time, divorce and single parenting were still pretty taboo." Comparing her own story to her biological mother's, she realized "that there is a silver lining to the erosion of the nuclear-family ideal and that we shouldn't forget about that.

"I think overall I wanted to remind people that the traditional family model excludes people. And there are plenty of people who should be included who don't fit into that model. I think our story is a case in point." In the movie, there is a clip from Mister Rogers' Neighborhood; he explains to his viewers that like the many different kinds of bird families that exist in nature, there are many different kinds of human families, as well, and "each one is fancy." Skloss admits in Sunshine that at first she didn't feel like her model of the family lived up to Mr. Rogers' assertion. But with a family unit that includes a precocious daughter, an ex-boyfriend who is fully committed to co-parenting, loving adoptive parents, and a biological family that has welcomed her with open arms, Skloss has something special. "It is fancy. But I think I had to make the movie to really realize we were fancy. And now I'm proud of it." ■



cally inspired or otherwise. In general, I think, cinema supports the investigation of our religious imaginations.

AC: The art in your animations is remarkable. What is your technique?

SJL: I draw on paper with a crow quill pen and a bottle of India ink, some gouache, and some waxy crayons on a heavy paper that I punch with a registration puncher. I shot the drawings under an Oxberry.

AC: What would you like viewers to take away from your film?

SJL: Can I respond to this question a year from now? I think I grew up in the Tom Stoppard "the artist provides one half, the spectator the second half" school of interactive art-making. ... If you have to explain to the audience what they're supposed to take away, you've failed.







Rock and a Hard Place

Exploring the elusiveness of fame and the ethics of the mash-up in 24 Beats per Second

To the list of great and enduring mysteries of the world, from the disappearance of Amelia Earhart to the career of Jimmy Kimmel, I now add this: how a heavy metal band with a lead singer who wore a bondage harness onstage and played his guitar with a dildo didn't become superstars in the 1980s. It just doesn't make any sense.

Turns out I share my confusion with Slash from Guns n' Roses, Lars Ulrich from Metallica, and Lemmy from Motörhead. For them, Canadian hard rockers Anvil were titans, the bridge between the new wave of heavy metal that brought the world Iron Maiden and the American speed metal of Slayer, Anthrax,

and Megadeth. With their lightningfast riffs, Saran Wrap-tight leather pants, and song titles such as "March of the Crabs,"

CILATION SOLET "Mothra," and "Butter-Bust Jerky," Anvil seemed destined to become one of the biggest bands in rock & roll. In 1983 the band released its masterpiece, Forged in Fire, and in 1984 Anvil toured Japan with metal giants Scorpions, Whitesnake, and Bon Iovi. culminating in a legendary concert at Tokyo's Super Rock Festival. Surely like those other

Twenty-five years and 13 albums after its Japanese triumph, Anvil isn't a successful band by any measure, but it is still a band. Their hair is thinner (though not shorter), their bellies are bigger, and their bondage gear no longer fits, but they're still here. Unlike Iron Maiden, Bon Jovi, and Metallica, Anvil's career has unfolded in almost total obscurity. Now in their early 50s, founding

bands, Anvil would go on to sell millions of

albums, write chart-topping power ballads, and

members Steve "Lips" Kudlow and Robb Reiner are still chugging through "Blood in the Playground" and "Mattress Mambo," only now they're doing so in dive bars and small concert halls in their native Ontario in between shifts at catering companies and telemarketing firms. The story of why Anvil never made it is one as old as the music industry itself – a combination of bad timing, bad luck, bad management, and any number of X factors – but the true tragedy of the band is that, even as Anvil faded into history, its influence on the bands that followed grew

deeper and deeper. Slash, I think, puts it best: "Everyone just ripped them off and then left them for dead."

> Just in time for the 25-year anniversary of Anvil's Super Rock performance, director (and former Anvil roadie) Sacha Gervasi is screening his new documentary, Anvil! The Story of Anvil, as part of South by Southwest Film's 24 Beats per Second music-documentary series. Sacha

follows boyhood friends Kudlow and Reiner from the snowy domesticity of their local Toronto through a misguided and mismanaged European tour and a misguided and mismanaged recording session in England before flying with them to Japan, where they make a semitriumphant return to the land of their highwater mark, Tokyo, playing the 11:30am slot at a small indoor music festival.

Along the way, they get lost driving to a show in Prague, miss trains, play in clubs where there are more people onstage than off, show off in solemn tones their absurd art collections, pontificate on the fleeting nature of fame, beg record labels to release their new album, fail to convince record labels to release



their new album, fight, quit, reunite, and play on amps that actually go to 11.

If it all sounds a lot like This Is Spinal Tap, you're not far off. It's hard not to listen to Lips philosophize about his Spanish Inquisition song, "Thumb Hang," and not wonder to yourself: Are these guys for real? Apparently even Gervasi's crew thought it was shooting a mockumentary, especially after Lips and Reiner had a run-in with a dodgy Romanian club owner who had sidestepped his contractual obligations and tried to pay the band in goulash.

But the band is real. What is surreal, meanwhile, is the music industry itself and all that goes with it: the ambition, the commercialism, the trend-mongering, the lust for fame and fortune, the one-in-a-million delusion that just around the corner, just at the next gig, just after the next record comes out, unfathomable celebrity will be yours. The whole notion is a disease, a noxious distemper that makes the brain feverish with thoughts of big money and adoring fans. The fever has consumed Lips and Reiner for 30 years, and no amount of industry indifference or tour-bus lunacy can ever seem to get them well.

The real tragedy of Anvil isn't that they never made it. The real tragedy is that the virtue of ambition has mutated into a curse, making it impossible for them to view their lives through anything but the distorted lens of their own need to be famous – kids, wives, and happiness be damned.

Had Anvil ever reached those rarefied heights of fame and stardom, the band one day might have been lucky enough to be sampled by Girl Talk. To try to get your head around what this one-man-band-behind-a-laptop is up to, imagine a song that features James Taylor mixed with 50 Cent mixed with Pixies mixed with Nas mixed with Weezer, all played over a pounding dance beat by a biomedical engineer from Pittsburgh. Follow that with a song that features samples from Journey, Elvis Costello, Ying Yang Twins, Ludacris, Boston, and M.I.A. Then listen to the Notorious B.I.G. rapping over "Tiny Dancer." Now sit back, and imagine hundreds of sweaty kids going crazy, tearing off their clothes, grabbing handfuls of balloons, storming the stage at some outdoor festival, and letting forth howls of recognition every 30 seconds or so.

This is the world of the mash-up, and Girl Talk is its undisputed crown prince. Standing shirtless behind his laptop computer, Girl Talk creates party classics out of spare parts, scavenging through the long history of American pop music and reconstituting what he finds there to make dance music that is all but irresistible to most mortals. Which may not sound like the most intellectual activity in the world, but to filmmaker Brett Gaylor, Girl Talk is the vanguard of a new movement that is redefining art, creativity, and the notion of intellectual property in a 21st century that is constantly blurring the line between creator and consumer.

intellectual property. He believes in collaboration and sampling; he believes in concepts like fair use and public domain. And he believes in something called "open source filmmaking." So much so that he made a movie-remixing website (www.opensourcecinema.org) for his new documentary, RiP: A Remix Manifesto. Anyone who visits the site is free to take Gaylor's footage and arrange it in any way he or she likes, meaning viewers become part of the creation of what they're watching. It's a revolutionary and dangerous new approach to documentary filmmaking, one that calls into question the whole notion of authorship and ownership and only further muddies the ethical and legal waters Girl Talk and Gaylor seem so happy to float around in.

Gaylor travels all over the world to explore the debate between intellectual-property rights and public-domain usage, a debate he believes will ultimately define just what kind

For the record, Gaylor doesn't believe in of global society we want to have: one based on the hoarding of copyrights by enormous multinational media conglomerates seeking to make money off every song or movie they lay claim to or one extolling the virtues of collaboration and the active reconstitution and reworking of past culture for the sake of future culture. For Gaylor and Girl Talk; professor and political activist Lawrence Lessig; the Baile Funk DJs of Brazil, who have taken over the favelas with their mash-ups of American pop music, funk, and Latin beats; and countless others, remixing is an act of democratization, of reclaiming art for artists and taking ownership out of the hands of corporations. On the other hand, for corporations, record labels, and copyright houses, remixing is an act of intellectual larceny, pure and simple, the outright theft of one artist's ideas by another at the monetary and creative expense of the originator (and his corporate sponsors, of course).

It's a fascinating debate, one Gaylor does great justice to with RiP, though in his rush to preach the word of complete artistic freedom, he fails to address a few pressing questions. How does he feel, for example, about artists who don't want their work sampled, manipulated, copied, or recontextualized? It's all well and good to thumb your nose at multimedia conglomerates trying to crush artistic growth through legal means; it seems like another thing entirely when the person complaining isn't some copyright lawyer but a poor folk musician whose song cycle about genocide in Darfur you're turning into a disco track.

And also, if the right to remix can go one way, won't it have to go both? If we make all artistic output part of the commons, doesn't that mean McDonald's can feel free to use a Fugazi song to sell its new Bacon McFlurry? I'm not sure, and I'm not sure if Gaylor's sure either, but it's to his credit that he's asked the questions at all and then opened the dance floor to debate.

It Came From Down Under

Aussie films swarm SXSW 09 BY DARCIE STEVENS





You'd be hard-pressed to find an American who can speak on Australian film without mentioning the names Russell Crowe, Heath Ledger, Nicole Kidman, or Olivia Newton-John. But away from Hollywood, the lucky country is brewing ace comedy, pulse-quickening thrillers, and social commentary filmed and produced on home soil. True, those Aussies talk funny, and it's hard to say if the U.S. is ready to trade lowbrow laugh tracks for a subtler brand. However, current caustic comedy sensations like *The Office* and *30 Rock* point to an American audience that's ready for change. Ta, Obama.

Australia has given us tales of crazy villages in the outback (*Welcome to Woop Woop*), cross-dressers on the rampage (*The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert*), and, of course, hard men with big hearts (*Crocodile Dundee*), but this year at South by Southwest, Australia's Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade wants us to know it's not all about kangaroos and costumes anymore.

The filmmakers of seven Down Under films, which range from slashers to piss-your-pants drollery, will attend SXSW 09, the result of a government grant for the Australia International Cultural Council through film body Screen Australia. Seeing as there's a 17-hour difference between Austin and Sydney, the *Chronicle* spoke with three of the films' directors, writers, and actors via e-mails from the future.

'The Square'

"A secret affair, a ruthless betrayal, a brutal revenge ... some things can't be buried." Aha! The glorious thriller mired in lust, passion, and greed. But *The Square*, directed by Aussie stuntman Nash Edgerton and written by brother

and actor Joel, isn't your typical grab-the-money-and-run heist movie.

The cinematic line between good guys and bad guys is blurred when married contractor Raymond Yale (David Roberts), who is building the titular luxury condos, finds his life flipped ass-end-up after getting involved with the beautiful Carla Smith (Claire van der Boom).

"My theory was that in real life, no one is only bad or only good," explains Nash from Sydney, "and the more I could base the characters in reality, then the more tense the film would be when the shit is going down."

The Square survives in a deceptive, paranoid world. It twists and jerks, and just when the rain clears, it implodes. The younger Joel – a bona fide Australian TV star – spent seven years on the script, his first as writer, along with late

addition Matthew Dabner. After nearly a decade in preproduction, *The Square* shot in seven weeks with Joel in the part of Billy, a guy just trying to make a buck. And as might be expected from a stuntman behind the lens, the result is panicked, tense, explosive.

anicked, tense, explosive. "Having worked on a lot

of films as a stuntman ... has just made me feel comfortable on a film set," Nash says. "It's where I have spent most of my adult life, so even though it was scary as hell directing a movie, at least I felt like I was at home."

'Three Blind Mice'

Matthew Newton might not be a stuntman, but he's tackled nearly every other task. As writer, director, and co-star of *Three Blind Mice*, his second feature, he made a contemporary wartime film sans any Michael Moore politicizing. Newton tells a story of fear and consequence through three mates on leave the night before shipping out for Iraq with the Royal Australian Navy: the conflicted Sam

Fisher, brilliantly acted by Ewen Leslie; the straight-laced Dean Leiberman (Toby Schmitz); and the class clown, played by Newton.

"It's an anti-war film that's unashamedly about people, not politics," Newton says. "I didn't want to debate the shoulds or shouldnots of governmental policy. ... I wanted to look past the uniform and see the faces of these people in whose hands we place our 'freedom' and to show them experiencing what I think young men should be doing with their time as an alternative to killing or being killed: meeting potential partners, being with friends, getting into trouble on their own terms, and trying to sort out the question of what it is to be a man."

Three Blind Mice is simultaneously horrific and hilarious and, perhaps ironically, walks alongside mumblecore, allowing dialogue to lead the dance, naturalism proliferating intimate scenes, whether tension is emanating from an angry, betrayed boy seeking escape or from Newton's joker. Despite the context of the film, Three Blind Mice comes down to friendship in hard times. The former child actor has found his outlet.

"There are many different pathways to expressing what you want to express," Newton says. "Some people are singers; some people fire paint out of a cannon. If you have something you want to put out there, you do it in some way no matter what your background is."

'Rats and Cats'

"I was having a shower at Adam's house, and he had a big wall mirror in the bathroom," Jason Gann snickers. "I came out and said to Adam, 'I wanna be nude in a movie!' We started there. Some people expose themselves to people in a park to get their rocks off. I dress it up as art and expose myself to thousands!"

Rats and Cats, written by Gann and longtime friend Adam Zwar, is the story of Darren McWarren, a washed-up film star who has escaped to the small town of Gladdington, Victoria. Gann and Zwar also star as the film's dynamic duo, Darren and journo Ben Baxter. This is the kind of offbeat, dark humor that Wes Anderson and Judd Apatow traffic in.

Darren quotes his former lines offhand, he sings in a band called Black Diamond, and he shags anything with a pulse. He survives on Claw game proceeds, is a certified Scuba instructor, and is shadowed by the duncelike Bruce (Paul Denny).

"We always liked the drama in Russell Crowe's career, and in a way, he was part of the inspiration for the character," director and third arm Tony Rogers explains. "Have you ever heard of Russell's band, 30 Odd Foot of Grunts? Darren is really a bit Russell, a bit of Jason Gann, and a whole lot of other influences."

Nothing really happens in *Rats and Cats*. There's no third-act epiphany, no mind-blowing twist, no acting. And that's beautiful. The dialogue rips with wit and sarcasm, the result of two friends who have been working together since well before their hit Aussie TV show,

Wilfred, now airing stateside on IFC, about a protective pot-smoking dog played by Gann in full furry gear. Oddly, he plays a monkey in his next show. An animal, that one.

Despite Gann's wildly eccentric personality (onscreen, at least), it's Zwar that keeps the film balanced. His Ben is unflinching and nonjudgmental, a true journalist, even if he works for the print equivalent of VH1's *Where They Are Now?*. His pointed questions serve as set up and boundary for Darren, who is always looking to impress. All told, *Rats and Cats* is half commentary on our celebrity-obsessed culture and half buddy movie that relishes in the rapport of its two leads.

"Australia has been in the wilderness with our own films in recent years," Gann admits, "but things look to be firing up again." Given the potential of the Gann-Zwar-Rogers troika, we'd say there's Buckley's chance that such fair dinkum dags will rack off Down Under for long.

Shot on Location

'For All Mankind' filmmaker Al Reinert goes walking on the moon one more time

Once upon a time, men walked on the moon. As the years of the Apollo space program recede further into history, that fact seems more like the stuff of fairy tales, but Al Reinert has the film to prove it. The former reporter for the Houston Chronicle and Texas Monthly was allowed into the vaults of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to pore over hundreds of hours of footage taken by American astronauts in the Sixties and Seventies, and from that he created For All Mankind, a film that took the space program out of the box – that 19-inch TV on which most Americans watched the NASA missions – and gave many people their first look at the moon as the astronauts saw it: life-sized and in vivid detail. Reinert's documentary marks its 20th anniversary this year with a new high-definition print developed by the Criterion Collection for release on Blu-ray. (On seeing the new transfer, Reinert, a self-described "low tech guy" - "I've still got a dial-up modem," he admits - was "astonished at the jump in clarity and color and brightness.") Lucky Austinites will get to see this print on the big screen at the Paramount Theatre on March 21 as part of South by Southwest.

Austin Chronicle: When did you get the idea for the film?

Al Reinert: I had written stories about NASA and had met a couple of the old Apollo astronauts. And by this time it was eight years or nine years since they'd been to the moon, and they were more relaxed about it. I mean, they had the kind of perspective that we all have on important points in our life that we don't get until years later. When they were going to the moon, they were obsessed with what they had to do; it was such a complicated mission that it was all ticky-tock. But that's not the way they remembered it years later, and I knew they had these great stories to tell, and that's when I discovered the film [at NASA]. I had the idea early on that this would make a great film, but I was not a film person. I had no idea how difficult it would be.

AC: How resistant was NASA to letting

you see this footage originally? AR: They weren't resistant. They were very welcoming. NASA was kind of in the doldrums. It was after the end of Apollo and before the space shuttle really got rolling, and they weren't that busy. I was the first person who showed up and said, "I want to look at every-

thing." I didn't have a clue what I was getting myself into. I mean, we're talking hundreds of hours of raw footage. I would drive down to NASA, and they didn't have the kind of security they have now. I would just drive right through the main gate up to the front door and check in and just look at film for hours and hours. You couldn't do that now. A lot of it was just luck.

I kept a little catalog of the coolest shots, everything that I thought was terrific. We had only seen little dribs and drabs of it on television on this tiny little screen, when they were out there on the biggest set in the history of cinema. The goal was to blow [the 16-millimeter originals] up to 35-millimeters, which had never been done. And I, being a journalist, didn't have a clue what a challenge we were setting

for ourselves. But we did it. We had to jump through all these hoops to get NASA's permission to do that. It's the first and last time they've ever done it, you know, actually take the original magazines out of the film vault.

AC: What footage really took your breath away? **AR:** Once they got to the moon, I would look at that stuff, and I found it hypnotic. Which is why I love the Brian Eno music with it. Eno's music - at least the music that he did for this - is very hypnotic itself, and the combination We have single shots that run two or three minutes, that nobody else would ever do, but they're beautiful shots, and when you put them with the music,

well, I don't mind watching it that long. Greg Curtis, the old Texas Monthly

editor, he's the one that told

me about Eno. I had an editing table in my living room, and I'd get up in the middle of the night and look at footage and play records to try and find the perfect music to play with the footage. And Greg Curtis turned me on to

Eno, and it was an instant fit in my head.

AC: The film is 20 years old, and it came 20 years after the first moon landing. Looking at it today, the whole Apollo program looks more improbable than ever – that these people pulled all that off with that level of technology.

AR: The whole thing is surreal, in a way that we didn't appreciate at the time. I remember watching that first landing on television, and I thought it was pretty spectacular, but I didn't really have an appreciation for it. It was too bizarre to really sink in. I think [that's true for] all of us. We appreciate it more in retrospect than we did at the time it was happening.



Going to the moon was an incredibly romantic adventure, and that's missing from American life these days. Obama's a pretty amazing character, but I'm not sure he could mobilize the country to do something that audacious, even if he wanted to. And that's sad. One of the great things to me when we took the film around - 'cause I spent a year on the film-festival circuit - was to see the way kids light up about it. Everybody needs that in their life, that kind of big, collective, communal adventure, and there just haven't been many lately.

AC: Are the kids who see it able to wrap their heads around the idea that we once had guys walking around on the moon?

AR: Yeah, they are, because the movie brings it home. One thing I'm really looking forward to at South by Southwest is this is all going to be new material for this audience in a way. We always had great discussions afterward, because it would pump them up, and more than the screening itself, I'm looking forward to the dialogue we're going to have afterward.

AC: If you were starting this project today, knowing what you know, how would you approach the subject differently? Or would you?


AR: I don't know if I would or not. I'd like to think I would make the same movie over again. I'd seen all the documentaries that had been made before it, and they were all information-driven, and that didn't satisfy me. What I wanted to do was make a film that communicated what it felt like to go to the moon. Really put you in the shoes of the astronauts. That's still the kind of movie that I would want to watch.

In a World Where ...

Plumbing the depths of Joe Dante's 'Trailers From Hell'

"When I first came out to L.A. in '74, there were a lot of film collectors out here, and I was a film collector, too," says Joe Dante, the man behind the Mogwai of Gremlins, the hirsute horrors of The Howling, and the director of what must be George W. Bush's least favorite episode of HBO's Masters of Horror, "Homecoming" (in which the corpses of American servicemen killed in Bush's Middle East folly rose up from their body bags to vote W. out of office).

"They used to commandeer theatres at midnight and just run hours of trailers; it's not a type of program that anyone can enjoy. You have to be a real fan to appreciate that many movie trailers for that amount of time. But it occurred to me, after some time, that I had all these great trailers, and since I had no place to run them anymore, I thought why not put them up on the Internet?"

The resulting site – TrailersFromHell.com - combines the best of genre (and, occasionally, nongenre) trailers with introductions and optional commentary tracks from some of the greatest directors, producers, effects artists, and grindhouse gurus in the world, from Allison Anders to George Hickenlooper, Eli Roth to Edgar Wright. It's not only one of the best collections of trailers ever assembled, it's also hopelessly addictive and a fine way to put off reading the studio's asinine "notes" on your screenplay for yet another week.

"We started out with the idea of only doing exploitation trailers," says Dante, "but as we enlisted more and more

people to be commentators, we found their tastes to be much broader than that. And so we've ended up with this eclectic assortment of movies that are classics and movies that are terrible and movies that are in between."

As every film geek and regular attendee of the Alamo Drafthouse's infrequent trailer marathons knows, the previews are almost always the best part of the communal moviegoing experience. Sadly, contemporary trailers are more often than not designed and cut together by corporate committees,

resulting in bland, unmemorable previews that can't hold a candle to their earlier counterparts, celebrated so effectively on Trailers From Hell.

Trailers From Hell With Joe Dante

Midnighters

"To me, trailers, when they're good, are like cinematic haiku. You're taking the essence of a movie, and you're boiling it down to 2½ minutes or thereabouts. Every decade had its own particular style: In the Forties, there were lots of lights, lots of onscreen cars, lots of hyperbole, and the Forties and Fifties are kind of my favorite period for trailers. Around the Sixties, people started getting a little more sophisticated about trailers. If you look back at the trailer for



the picture The Grapes of Wrath, for example, it's always astonishing how much more sophisticated the movie is than the trailer, so that it could appeal to the widest possible audience. But in the Sixties, some of the filmmakers started to actually assert control over the advertising of their films, and then you got people like Kubrick who basically were responsible for the trailers for pictures like 2001 and Dr. Strangelove."

Today, of course, what we get are "guys running away from the exploding fireball," notes Dante. "With Don LaFontaine, the trailer-voice guy who recently passed away, he was one of the reasons trailers used to be so memorable. Lines of his entered the cultural lexicon and became almost cliché. For instance, I dare you to find me a modern trailer that doesn't have the word 'now' in it. It's just a bromide. And it's really hard these days to find a really clever trailer, because there's so much money riding on the movies that the producers are terrified that they're going to strike out. It's kind of sad, but that's the exact opposite of what we try to celebrate about movie trailers on the site."

The Cutting Edge

Trailer-maker Mark Woollen talks shop

"You know, it can be hard getting a joke to work. Something that's hilarious in the movie and you want to feature prominently just doesn't play in the short form without the setup, and that's really tough when you should be showcasing comedy." This sort of thing is a workaday challenge for award-winning trailer editor Mark Woollen. But it's the kind of problem that too many movie trailers resolve in a morass of plodding plot points and would-be catch phrases punctuated by scratching phonograph needles and metallic impact noises and held together with moldy Motown hits or snatches of score from the blockbuster action hit of three summers ago. That's a world away from the sly, stylish work that Mark Woollen & Associates have done for films as different from one another and as hard to summarize as Lost in Translation, Burn After Reading, or Che. His Making the Perfect Trailer workshop at South by Southwest will aim to demystify the mechanics of crafting movie ads that at their best serve as beguiling invitations to singular experiences.


Austin Chronicle: So as I watched a bunch of your trailers, I was really impressed, but I also realized you're the guy who's to blame for getting me all hyped up to see some movies that it turned out I hated!

Mark Woollen: Well, I guess did my job. ... You're not going to come to the panel and ask for your money back from me, are you?

AC: No way, it's great. So how did you get into this? MW: Well, I was really fortunate that the public high school I went to had a media program where we got to do video production. And when I was 17, I was actually cutting long-form shows for school, and I happened to read an ad in Variety looking for a trailer editor. So I applied, and I actually got the job and learned the ropes. ... When I first started, I didn't know how trailers were put together at all. You know, there are a lot of odd assumptions people have about how this is done, like you just take the best scenes and put them together or something ... but it's really more involved than that and interesting as a process.

AC: You tend to really simply present a premise but really emphasize a sense of texture and mood of the film's experience as opposed to, you know, hitting every beat of the plot, sometimes to the point of spoiling the movie itself or just making it look dumb.

MW: I know what you're talking about. I hate those as well. You know, the cliché voice-



of-God narrator laying out the whole thing, going, "In a world" and stuff. ... I like to think we don't do that. There are a lot of bad trailers. As many as bad movies, probably. But I feel really lucky that we get to do a lot of films we really love and respect, so it's a great challenge for us to work at putting across how the movie feels.

AC: And what's the essential thing you're look-

MW: Well, every piece is as different as every film. ... Of course there are the ones where story is the strength of the film, but a lot of the ones we work on are very strong in performance, for instance. And you want to make sure that that's what you're showing the

audience, because it can be the most important thing for making people want to see it. ... The Wrestler trailer is obviously about a remarkable performance, not a heavily detailed story, but really showcasing Mickey Rourke. ... In the case of Slumdog Millionaire, we started in one direction going more into story, which is the big strength of that movie, but it's actually really tough. We've got a lot of different characters to juggle, at different ages, and that can be hard to get across in so little time - time's really the single biggest enemy you have, and you have to convey an essence. ... But then as the acclaim started building at festivals, that actually became more of the direction to take it, doing more the Academy campaign or review-based trailer.

I'm lucky my company can actively work at pursuing certain trailers, and I try to get jobs with films by filmmakers I love. I knew that they had been trying to make Milk for 20 years, and I love Gus Van Sant's films, so when I heard they were finally doing it, I felt like I'd just be lucky to have a chance to help the film. And we just ask, "What can we do for the film?" and work hard to get it right.

In Praise of Silliness

Because of the hard times, it's no surprise that escapist TV is making an appearance in the recent slate of premieres. Another comedy from ABC is not exactly turning its back on the way of the world, but it's having a high time skewering it. The new comedy Better Off Ted pokes fun at corporate greed and amorality, and I like it. I like it a lot. Now if I sound mildly defensive, it's only because the series is so silly and the situations so outlandish that something

tells me I shouldn't like it as much as I do. But internal second-guessing critic begone! Better Off Ted made me laugh, pure and simple. And believe me, after a steady diet of dire predictions about the economy, shrinking retirement funds, and friends losing their jobs, this bit of silliness suits me just fine.

Jay Harrington (Desperate Housewives) plays Ted (just Ted, no last name), an executive in charge of research and development at a conglomerate called Veridian Dynamics. R&D comes up with products that run the gamut from weird and useless to ethically questionable. Ted is a good guy, a single father trying to raise his little girl at home while trying to

little girl at home while trying to keep the gravy train from veering too far off the track at work. In fact, daughter Rose (Isabella Acres) is often the one who reminds her dad to consult his moral compass when his boss, Veronica (Arrested Development's

Portia de Rossi), who largely operates without one, leads him down some very strange rabbit holes (as in when she wants to cryogenically freeze an employee just to see if she can).

As a workplace comedy, Better Off Ted is less subtle than something like The Office. Instead, it gleefully veers toward the absurd, in the tradition of My Name Is Earl or Arrested Development. Like Mad Men, the workplace drama set during the 1960s, Ted has a smart (though modern) look to it, complemented by a swanky soundtrack. In short, Better Off Ted is like Mad Men on helium.

Unlike all the referenced series, *Better Off Ted* has a smaller core cast, which could be a detriment. It seems that so many more kooky situations could be concocted with a few more passing characters in the mix. Still, the assembled cast is engaging, and all seem to be having a great time. Joining Harrington and the hilarious de Rossi — who has perfected the ice-princess routine — is Andrea Anders (*Joey*) as one of Ted's

employees. She and Ted are attracted to each other but can't decide if it's a good idea to get involved. Anders deserves props for bringing a lot of charm to an otherwise run-of-the-mill, nice-girl role. The lab rats Phil and Lem (Jonathan Slavin and Malcolm Barrett) are particularly funny playing geeks with no social skills and even less backbone (Veronica convinces Phil that it would be an honor to see if his eyes would explode at minus 20 degrees Celsius when she selects him to be frozen and set aside like a box of fish sticks).

While it's promoted as a satire, I'm not sure that label sticks very well. Missing is

the shadow of authentic concern for the real corporate ills the show's press says the series takes on. Still, it is great fun and a perfectly harmless way to while away a half-hour.

Better Off Ted premieres

Better Off Ted premieres March 18, 7:30pm, on ABC.

Also premiering this week: Modern Toss. This partially animated adult sketch comedy is short-attentionspan theatre defined. Based on the Britishborn comic strip and website, this series features recurring characters that are in themselves funny: sign-maker Mr. Tourette; bickering astronauts in outer space; a pair of celebrity-obsessed flies who share their off-kilter observations in a sketch called "Fly Talk" (my favorite); Mr. Sneezeman (another favorite), a nose on legs who seems to be allergic to everything; and the Gnat Burglar, who is simply too gross to describe. Interestingly, I found myself thinking I would prefer watching this show on a smaller screen, like a phone. It would certainly keep my interest if I were stuck in an airport for a couple of hours. Watching on the larger screen, not so much. Except maybe with beer. Lots of beer.

Blaze's Blues

According to local director Kevin Triplett, Drunken Angel: The Legend of Blaze Foley opens with a trailer for a fictitious documentary, which glorifies the mythic status the eccentric songwriter has amassed since being shot and killed 20 years ago in Austin. The remainder of Triplett's film, which premieres this year at South by Southwest Film, attempts to unravel the mystery behind the duct-taped poet. "Blaze was a very complex character because he was so many things to so many different people," he says (see "A Walking Contradiction," Dec. 24, 1999). "He was a songwriter and a bum, very caring but a belligerent drunk. I tried to give enough clues for the audience to piece together who he might have been." A decade in the making, Drunken Angel features more than 100 interviews, including Merle Haggard, Gurf Morlix, Mandy Mercier, KUT's Larry Monroe, and Sybil Rosen ("Faded Love," Oct. 31, 2008), all of whom, with the exception of Haggard, served as advisers on the film. Not having seen the doc, OTR can't speak to its merits, but it does boast exclusive footage of Foley performing at a friend's wedding, along with unreleased living room recordings from 1976 and 1978. Triplett hopes a soundtrack will soon follow: "This is the best I could do at presenting the truth." Drunken Angel: The Legend of Blaze Foley screens Wednesday, March 18, 7pm, at the Austin Convention Center.

Saturday's headliner pairs garage rock pioneer Sky Sunlight Saxon of the Seeds with Austin's Shapes Have Fangs as World Spirits. "He's a giant influence, a musical idol," enthuses Fangs' singer/guitarist Dustin Coffey, who has a new vinyl split with Sunday's Cavedweller. "[Saxon] let us rummage through his vast catalog of songs to pick out what we want to play. We've been practicing for weeks now." Along with certified Seeds nuggets like "Can't Seem to Make You Mine" and "Satisfy You," Shapes Have Fangs have also rehearsed a few of Saxon's early doo-wop singles, recorded under the name Little Richie Marsh.



Elsewhere on the 13th Floor, Erickson resurrects Rokkervil, his collaboration with Okkervil River, for his annual Psychedelic Ice Cream Social at Threadgill's March 19, benefiting the Health Alliance for Austin Musicians and featuring the Heartless Bastards, Black Joe Lewis, and Ray Wylie Hubbard, among others. Meanwhile, Elevators' collaborator and former Waller Creek Boy Powell St. John (see "The Kingdom of Heaven," Dec. 22, 2006) visits the South Austin Museum of Popular Culture this Saturday, March 14, 7:09pm, commemorating the opening of his new art exhibit - surrealistic displays of sex, madness, and the vivid connection between the two – before his SXSW showcase at the **Music Gym** next Friday, March 20. The Black Angels' Alex Maas also turns on for the occasion.







Never Say Goodbye

Past and present mash up at the 2008-09 Austin Music Awards

Hissing and crackling on the tape immediately reveals its age, an artifact from a forgotten time. Those familiar with the source material estimate its year of origin around 1974. A crooked, acoustic guitar riff winds its way into the fold, then circles back around, its repetition developing a subtle, hypnotic groove. The voice of young Roky Erickson emerges like an apparition, not with a beastly howl but tender, yearning, starry-eyed:

"Thank God for civilization."

He repeats the line again and again, as if chanting a serenity prayer, calm and unnerving. In the background, his contemporary musical spawn, Austin's psych evangelists the Black Angels, colors around the recording, embracing its worn charm and adding an incensing wall of 1960s pop that flashes back to Congress Avenue's onetime Vulcan Gas Co. The effect is pure magic, like a séance between the living and resurrected. A mash-up for the ages.

Few people have heard this new demo, helmed by local producer Erik Wofford, but its symbolic reverberations will be felt when the two parties headline the 2008-09 Austin Music Awards. The pairing of **Roky Erickson with the Black Angels** couldn't be more appropriate. The latter's sublime 2006 debut, Passover, picked up where the former's 13th Floor Elevators and their landmark Easter Everywhere left off four decades prior. The Angels' Directions to See a Ghost (see "I See Dead People," May 9, 2008) last year only deepened the connection, the locals opening for and backing Erickson on a West Coast tour, not to mention the band refreshing its forefather on visionary and forgotten Elevators classics like "Don't Fall Down" and "Roller Coaster."

"It's been a surreal experience," opines Black Angels guitarist Christian Bland. "The Elevators have always been something I listen to on a daily basis. It's influenced the way that I live and create. In so many ways, this brings everything full circle."

Erickson's demonic visions also seeped into the confrontational theatrics of the Dicks, in particular iconoclastic frontman Gary Floyd, who covered "Red Temple Prayer (Two Headed Dog)" with Sister Double Happiness for levitating 1990 tribute Where the Pyramid Meets the Eye. The shaft of Texas punk, dating back to the first Punk Prom at Raul's (see "Saturday Night at the Bookstore," May 12, 2000), Floyd represented "the queerest of the queer," as AMAs Director Margaret Moser surmised in her review of the essential anthology collection Dicks 1980-1986. "The Big Boys may have been bigger, but the Dicks were harder. The Big Boys screamed, but the Dicks seethed. The Big Boys were politically aware, but the Dicks were political."

The Dicks' riotous performance art didn't just make a mark on the scene. It left scars, especially on acts like Seattle's grunge grandfathers Mudhoney and Austin's Butthole Surfers, paving the way for the Trance Syndicate era on Red River, along with the Dicks' special AMA guest David Yow of

'Watching them play wasn't scary, but I feared for my safety," the Jesus Lizard told the Chronicle last month. "There was a good chance you were going to get hit in the face. There was a chaos but also a whole lot of fun. They were able to bring Motown into the Sex Pistols. I always dug that. ...

"There was nothing left in the closet. It was all in-your-face shit." From the Six Strings Down tribute to Clifford Antone, with Jimmie Vaughan and Gary Clark Jr. two years ago, to Joe Ely's 1999 teaming with Reckless Kelly, the AMAs specialize in weaving the common threads that make up the rich tapestry of Austin music. It's not so much a passing of the torch that takes place but the bridging of generational divides. That's clearly the case with the improbable pairing of **Bob Schneider and the Fireants**.

A two-decade-long veteran of the local scene, Schneider's been a consistent live draw since people actually paid to see music on Sixth Street, every one of his musical incarnations - Joe Rockhead, Ugly Americans, the Scabs, Lonelyland seemingly more popular than the last, and his "40 Dogs (Like Romeo and Juliet)" dominated local airwaves in 2008. Though young enough to be his bastard children, the Fireants exem-

plify Austin's next generation (see "Smells Like Teen Spirit," Oct. 24, 2008), the cream of a bumper crop of prodigiously talented teen acts immersed in local lore and ready to cut their teeth.

Likewise, the Southern siren showcase syncs up three of Austin's leading ladies in a manner not celebrated since 1990's Dreams Come True, the collaboration between Marcia Ball, Angela Strehli, and Lou Ann Barton. YouTube sensation Suzanna Choffel is a young vixen whose smoky vocals and exuberant eclecticism beget her casual allure (see "The Next Fun Fearless Female Rock Star," Nov. 28, 2008). Phenomenal Ruthie Foster continues to expand her soulful elocution while defining her personal Truth (see "Texas Platters," Feb. 13), and firebrand Carolyn Wonderland solidified her Lone Star standing last year with her Ray Benson-produced, bluesy triumph, Miss Understood (see "Miss Understood," May 2, 2008), culminating with an appearance on Austin City Limits. Together, the trio embodies yet another wave of fiercely independent, local female singer-songwriters, each drawing from the same wellspring of Americana and making it her own.

Few better represented that ideal than Doug Sahm, who, even before his untimely death nearly a decade ago, was already the patron saint of Austin music. He practically invented the modern mash-up with his Sir Douglas Quintet, creating a melting pot of Tex-Mex, New Orleans jazz, Americana, sweaty R&B, and Cajun music that always sizzled. On the 40th anniversary of the group's seminal Mendocino, his heir Shawn Sahm and lifelong musical compadre Augie Meyers prove once more that his legacy is alive and well with SDQ2, coinciding with new covers compilation Keep Your Soul: A Tribute to Doug Sahm. Think of it as a reappropriation of the past for future generations.

After all, the Texas Tornado is fewer than six degrees connected to every artist on this bill. He produced Erickson's "Red Temple Prayer (Two Headed Dog)," and at least part of his spirit is stitched into SDQ2 guest **Alejandro Escovedo**'s autobiographical revelation, Real Animal (see "Fantastic Journey," June 20, 2008), along with the very fabric of Austin. At the 2008-09 Austin Music Awards, as with every year, the circle indeed remains unbroken.

Free drugs and living-room rock

I've caught Michael Coomers just waking up, and the wind's blowing through his cell phone as he walks to get coffee. It's fitting because Harlem has bedhead as well, a haze of out-of-tune guitar and poppy harmonies that feels eraless.

Coomers and Curtis O'Mara, who switch off on guitar, drums, and vocals, grew up in Tucson, Ariz., and played in bands together.

O'Mara moved to Nashville, and Coomers joined him. They couldn't get a show in that city, so they hopped in the van again and eventually ended up back in Tucson. Miraculously, they've only been a band for about two years. Coomers is good at telling stories, and whether they're true or not, you can see how he might come up with lyrics.

"In Tucson, Curtis fell into a ditch and broke his arm," he begins. "He was at a bar, and this girl's wearing a White Zombie T-shirt, and they're talking, and he thinks she likes him, so he follows her down a road, and he accidentally falls into a ditch. When his arm got better, we recorded the last half of *Free Drugs*, but we didn't want to stay in Tucson. We knew some kids here, so we moved."

Harlem's recent surge in popularity here and in the blogosphere still seems strange to Coomers, who traces the band's history through hotel rooms, miles of road, and the inability to get booked in most cities they roll into. Even with such environmental upheaval,

2008's *Free Drugs* only took a year to write.

"We were desperate and hungry for it, I guess," offers Coomers.

Reflecting precisely that, the self-released LP takes a short and sweet tape-hiss road

trip through songs about boredom and "Psychedelic Tits." The trio's live shows can be spot-on or sloppy messes, bassist Christian Swamper the group's grounding influence, and one such show caused Don Bolles of the Germs to compare them live to "Lord of the

Harlem recently started a cover-of-themonth club on its MySpace, which already features the band's take on the Plastic Ono

Band and Q Lazzarus, and when the dreaded "G" word (garage rock) comes up, Coomers offers an alternative.

"I guess we're livingroom rock. We were dining-room rock, but our bass player lives

there now."

Insert rim shot here. If Harlem isn't technically proficient, they sure write damn catchy songs. Coomers agrees.

"A guitar has six strings, and that's all I know."

UME Power trio creates a voltaic 'Sunshower'

Austin's 7-vear-old

toddler finding its

footing in a rush of

indie rock.

The stereo is melting, waves of guitar spilling out and rising up, slowly forming towering thunderheads and streaks of gray. Lauren Larson's voice is the catalyst, a chilling reminder of the beauty in intensity. She conducts the storm, an electric maestro.

This is Ume (ooo-may), Austin's 7-year-old toddler finding its footing in a rush of indie rock. After years spread across the country, the Houston-formed trio coalesced locally two This is Ume (ooo-may),

trio coalesced locally two years ago. The resulting EP, *Sunshower*, rains down magnetic.

"This was the first time we paid real attention to our sounds," says Larson.
"When we did the first album, I was still trying to find my voice.

"I found my voice on this record."

Ume released its debut LP, *Urgent Sea*, in 2005 on New York imprint Pretty Activity, but *Sunshower* is nothing if not a call to arms from a reborn band. Where the full-length was spastic, *Sunshower*, recorded by longtime Austin producer Chris "Frenchie" Smith, is heavy, euphoric.

"We did the whole thing ourselves," nods Larson. "We funded it ourselves. We put it out ourselves. This was a completely DIY project, but it was also just to get some attention to get someone to help us with the full-length."

While Larson lets loose onstage, her long yellow fringe windmilling with the ebbs of odd chords and sudden progressions, her bassist husband, Eric Larson, and drummer Jeff Barrera

slowly notch up the power, setting a song afire in a breath. The three play off one another without making eye contact, the result of a group determined to organically access its volatility. Eric's anxious bass thump meets Barrera's

syncopated taps, with Lauren boiling over until the clouds open up and the power spills out.

The live show combined with the beauty of the EP have garnered Ume accolades from around the globe, culminating in newfound superfan Dave Allen, Gang of Four bassist, Twittering to promote the band. In an era where überlabels such as Touch and Go are forgoing new music, Ume crosses its fingers.


"When we were first starting to write a lot of these songs, there was a moment where we switched from just having these songs to actually having a purpose for them," explains Eric Larson. His wife agrees:

PUBLIC OFFENDERS

ATX hip-hop's call to action on the positive tip

The phrase "It's bigger than hip-hop" gets more use in the rap game these days than it probably should, but it's a sentiment that rings true with Public Offenders. The Austin quartet – Quincy Ockletree, Damien Williams, Yolanda Zapata, and Drailand Bell – makes music as a vehicle for something much more important: putting an end to domestic violence.

"We've always dealt with community issues and things that

involve real life," says Zapata, a victim of abuse. "We lost a good friend through domestic abuse, and she's been a big inspiration for us. We're trying to give the message to ladies that you can prevail and make it through."

The foursome's road to the present has been a short and hectic one. After co-founding East Austin commu-

nity activist organization the Cipher with Shannon Sandrea in 2007, the Offenders were tapped to perform at the STAR Conference, an annual local gathering focused on combating family violence. In attendance were Ted Bunch and Tony Porter, the co-founders of the New York-based A Call to Men, who asked the group to perform at its national conference in New Orleans.

"It's definitely been a stepping stone," says the group's leader, Ockletree. "We're already in contact with other organizations on the positive tip, but that's the aim we've taken on.

We want to be speaking out on these issues, like poverty and oppression, that affect our people."

In that vein, they put together January's *Drop Jewels*, an 11-song call to action released through the A Call to Men organization. The album, which takes more from the positive aspects of Tupac Shakur's work than the Outlawz's entire post-'Pac catalog, is one of the most focused local

hip-hop releases in recent memory.

"What separates us from others is the message that we bring," suggests Ockletree. "Everyone who's touching on the same thing is only following the industry. We're doing shows that have never had hip-hop at their events. That's what's keeping us alive in Austin. We feel it's our duty to

keep pushing for people who are looking for this voice."

The members have been so committed that Ockletree's brother Christopher left the group after *Drop Jewels* came out to focus on running the Cipher organization. Don't expect the other four to follow suit.

"We're gonna keep the movement going until the day we drop in the casket," announces Williams. "We're already planning the next album, which will be called *Permanent Oppression*. As long as domestic violence is around in this world, PO will be around." — *Chase Hoffberger*

BROWNOUT

Latin funk beamed down from the Grupo Fantasma mother ship

Simply put, Brownout is too good to play second saxophone any longer. Since the band's 2004 inception, the eightpiece local funk mob has lived in the shadow of mother ship Grupo Fantasma, which exploded last year with A-list

gigs backing Prince and a Grammy nomination for 2008's *Sonidos Gold*. While Grupo adds hints of R&B to cumbia, salsa, and merengue, Brownout delves deep into heavy grooves with dashes of Latin *sabor*.



"We haven't ever treated Brownout like a real band; it's always been a side project," explains guitarist and leader of both acts Adrian Quesada. "Compared to the last few years, Grupo's going to take it easy, which still means 100 shows, but we're going to focus a little bit more on Brownout."

That's good news for anyone hooked on *Homenaje*, Brownout's 2007 debut, which connects the musical dots between Earth,

Wind & Fire and Santana, the J.B.'s and Fania Records. Quesada describes the upcoming Águilas y Cobras as a more focused effort. Águila is Spanish for eagle, an obvious nod to the Mexican flag and the ancient city of Tenochtitlán —

"It has nothing to do with that," Quesada interrupts. "This band is a long series of

inside jokes. It's another one of those things that makes no sense to anybody but us."

The title remains a mystery, but a sneak peek proves nothing impenetrable about the infectious sides. While *Homenaje* was largely instrumental, *Águilas* contains vocal arrangements inspired by everyone from the Temptations to the Beatles. "Con el Cuete" is a brick-house dual pairing of Brownout's sig-

nature Latin funk and blistering rock guitars with the chanting of a Spanish warning: Keep your *pistola* in your pocket.

"It's alluding to what's going on down on the border, and it's scary," Quesada says. "We hear about the violence more and more in the mainstream media, but we actually hear about it directly from our families."

The border runs deep in Brownout, with half the band originally hailing from Laredo,

while trombonist Leo Gauna was born a stone's throw from Mexico. In high school, guitarist Beto Martinez, bassist Greg Gonzalez, and drummer Johnny Lopez rocked house parties as the Blimp, later joining forces with Quesada and company in Austin for James Browninspired jam sessions.

"It feels good to us because

it's like coming full circle with what we originally did," Quesada concludes. "If we hadn't started playing cumbias, we probably wouldn't be here talking about this. It seems like we finally have everyone's attention – I mean we got a fucking Grammy nomination – and now we can show people where it all started."

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HACIENDA

Thickfreakness from a family band


In February, Hacienda made its network television debut on Late Night With Conan O'Brien, backing the Black Keys' Dan Auerbach. Behind the frontman's gruff, soulful voice, the San Antonio-bred quartet laid a bed of bouncing roots, Dante Schwebel stepping to the mic to harmonize as Abraham Villanueva pounded out an organ-tinged rhythm on keys.

"That was the first time that we actually played together," reveals Auerbach, who's adopting the band – brothers Abraham, Rene, and Jaime Villanueva and cousin Schwebel for his entire tour, including his showcase at SXSW 09. "After three run-throughs of 'My Last Mistake,' it was down. We moved on and played half the record. It felt so good.'

Like fellow lone stars the Black Angels backing Roky Erickson's psychedelic howl or the Strange Boys supporting Mighty Hannibal's classic R&B, Hacienda has an easy chemistry with Auerbach born of influence. After hearing some demos from the group, Auerbach requested that Hacienda open for the Black Keys at an Austin show in late 2006, later inviting the band to his Akron, Ohio, studio.

Last year's resulting debut, Loud Is the Night, shimmers with naturally bred Beach Boys harmonies and soulful pop cut into rootsy, garage rhythms. With touches of British Invasion and the hometown lilt of Doug Sahm and the Krayolas, the LP sweeps an array of 1960s sounds. Members of Dr. Dog added further complementary touches to the album, offering Hacienda the opening slot on their tour last fall.

"It really helps when a band like that takes you out," affirms Schwebel. "We weren't under any pressure to draw anywhere. We were the first band going on, but because of



the association with Dr. Dog, people were really willing to listen."

Hacienda has begun writing and recording new songs with Auerbach and hopes to have its sophomore effort finished by fall. In the meantime, the band is testing the familial bonds with life on the road.

"It helps more than it hurts," laughs Schwebel of the band's kinship. "We used to fight all the time before we were in a band anyway, so usually any of the stuff we fight about doesn't have anything to do with the band. Maybe musically we tend to be a bit harder on each other, but we also know when to give a little. I guess all the sensitivities have gone out the window by now since we've known each other so long. It's a lot easier if Jaime just throws a drumstick at me than if he tries to care about my feelings or something."

BALMORHEA

Neoclassical instrumentalists venture into the wild

William B. Dewees was one of Stephen F. Austin's Old Three Hundred, a colonist from Kentucky in search of a new beginning. His Letters From an Early Settler of Texas to a Friend, published in 1852, offers a glimpse of the frontier life, torn between his fascination with the idyllic nature of his surroundings and the innate danger it imposed. Surveying the banks of the Colorado River, he wrote to his correspondent:

"I have never witnessed a sight of the kind, which, in my opinion, was more beautiful than this. The color any I have ever before seen. ... Yet

we are in a country with which we are entirely unacquainted; no road, no compass, and at the point of starvation."

This excerpt, scrawled on the inside cover of Balmorhea's third LP, All Is Wild, All Is Silent, serves as a backdrop to the band's instrumental impressionism. Deeply cinematic in its scope, the local sextet bridges the neoclassical realm of Max Richter with the refined elegance of Sigur Rós, creating graceful portraits of piano, banjo, and acoustic guitar. Like its inspiration, All Is Wild, All Is Silent unravels a fictional narrative that explores the vastness of the high plains and West Texas skyline with a forlorn, romantic wonderment.

"There's not a lot of adventure left in the world, at least not in the old-fashioned sense," opines Rob Lowe, a classically trained pianist whose spatial phasing recalls that of Arvo Pärt. "We're left to define what it means to be an explorer in our own terms. Our music lends itself to that idea of finding and celebrating the grandeur in the ordinary or mundane."

The emotional malleability of Balmorhea's compositions takes root in the interplay between its co-founders, Lowe and multiinstrumentalist Michael Muller. The two first started playing together in late 2006, with the band's eponymous debut - a collection of sparse instrumentals and found sound following soon after.

Last year's serene Rivers Arms found Balmorhea expanding its horizons to include upright bass, strings, and wordless vocals, a move that's mastered on All Is Wild, All Is Silent. A remix compilation of the album, featuring interpretations by contemporaries such as Bexar Bexar, Eluvium, and Peter Broderick, is set for release this fall. If that wasn't enough, Balmorhea's also wrapped up its fourth LP and has no intention of slowing down any time soon.

"It doesn't seem like we're moving at an exceptional pace," Lowe contends.

"It's a matter of the group really changing and coming into its own," says Muller. "It's all felt very natural and organic."

Late last year, Ben Mallott (rhymes with "a lot") released his debut, Look Good, Feel Good, and a mature new voice emerged from Austin's musical underground. Originally from Houston, the 32-year-old singer-songwriter came to Austin for a bit of college but more so the music.

"It was deliberate and I think as well-thoughtout as it could've been," he asserts. "I admit to trying to write a soul song when I came up with 'I Want It All.' I tried to write that for two years.

In front of an audience, Mallott and his band are even more uncompromising, whipping out a warped yet rootsy rendition of Talking Heads' "Psycho Killer."

"We recorded that, but it's not on the record because everyone says it doesn't fit," shrugs Mallott. "I think it's a kickass song. I would not disagree that it's out of place in the live set, but in six months it won't be. Some of the songs I'm writing now are energetic and straightforward and a little less country. They're going to be surprising to the band.

"It really is a tightrope act to balance it all. People come up to me all the time and say, 'You need to stop that shit and find your sound.'

In Marseille, France, in January, according to Reuters, a 21-year-old man became the latest bank burglar with an ambitious plan and a mediocre sense of direction, as he drilled through the outside wall of a branch of Banque Populaire but missed the room with the safe-deposit boxes and wound up instead in a restroom.

LEAD STORY

University of California researchers, on a Pentagon contract, announced in January their success at rigging a live flower beetle with electrodes and a radio receiver to enable scientists to control the insect's flight remotely. Pulses sent to the bug's muscles or optic lobes can command it to take off, turn left or right, or hover, according to a report in MIT's Technology Review, and the insect's large size (up to a whopping 4 inches in length) would enable it to also carry a camera, giving the beetle military uses such as surveillance or search and rescue. The researchers admired the native flight-control ability of the beetle so much that they abandoned developing robot beetles (which required trying to mimic nature).

WHY THEY GO POSTAL

An official from the National Association of Letter Carriers in Buffalo, N.Y., said in February that the association would challenge the U.S. Postal Service's threatened suspension of a carrier who was using sidewalks to get from house to house this winter instead of walking across icepacked, deep-snowdrift yards. Cutting across yards is required by Postal Service rules in order to speed up deliveries.

SCENES OF THE SURREAL

1) Allahmanamjad Barbel, 21, sought help in February at the police station in Barnstable, Mass., after his sister playfully put handcuffs on him at a birthday party and couldn't get them off. Police removed them

and then, after running his name through the computer, discovered several outstanding warrants and immediately recuffed him. 2) Doctoral student Daniel Bennett filed a lawsuit against Britain's Leeds University in February because custodians had mistakenly thrown out research that he had been working with for the last seven years. Bennett is studying the rare Butaan lizard of the Philippines and over the years, to examine its diet, had painstakingly sifted through jungle dirt to gather over 70 pounds of its feces, which Bennett believes is worth far more than the \$720 Leeds has offered him.

THE ENTREPRENEURIAL SPIRIT

A coin-operated, self-service dog-washing machine ("self" meaning the dog's owner, not the dog) has been introduced in a halfdozen car washes in the United States recently, at \$10 for 10 minutes, according to a January report on one such franchise in Stuart, Fla. The K9000 is a 3-foot-high, walk-in shower area (or push-in, for reluctant dogs) with an open top and has six separate wash cycles, conditioner and fleaand-tick options, and adjustable water pressure and dryer settings.

At Mannerspielplatz ("Men's Playground") near Kassel, Germany, testosterone-fueled office workers can get in touch with their "inner ditchdigger" (according to a January Wired magazine report) and frolic all day long on 29-ton backhoes, 32-ton front-end loaders, jackhammers, and various other big, loud vehicles for an admission fee of about \$280 a day. At the Men's Playground, the owner said, "We fulfill men's dreams."

WEIRD BIOLOGY

"Reproduction is no fun if you're a squid," said a biologist at the University of Groningen in the Netherlands, referring especially to the deep-sea squid. Finding a mate a mile down in pitch darkness is hard enough, but the combination of males that are smaller than females and fearful of being overpowered and females whose reception of sperm involves being stabbed makes the insemination process especially traumatic. Sperm deposits can be extensive and burdensome to the female and are delivered by the reckless slashing of the skin by the male. In fact, according to a December report in Germany's Der Spiegel, in the darkness, the male sometimes misses the female altogether and inseminates himself.

Princeton University scientists, reporting in January on research in Peru, said they observed aggressive, carnivorous behavior for the first time among dung beetles, which decapitated and ate millipedes. Dung beetles were not known previously to be fussy eaters (except for a 2006 study in which they seemed to prefer horse dung to camel dung or sheep dung).

LEADING ECONOMIC INDICATORS

People With Too Much Money: At Tokyo's first fish auction of 2009 in January, the upscale Kyubey restaurant and the more moderate Itamae Sushi dining chain jointly purchased a single, 280-pound bluefin tuna for the equivalent of about \$104,000. Kyubey said it would cut its half into slivers priced at about \$22 each, while the popular Itamae planned to offer tinier, more affordable slivers.

In Hong Kong, according to a February Wall Street Journal report, when a feng shui master speaks on the economy, investors listen closely (especially in view of the mess quantitative analysis has made of things). Alion Yeo, an expert on the Chinese system of beliefs in stars, geography, and the location of objects and whose popular finance seminars attract high-end investors, told a group of about 170 recently that 2009 would be dismal because the U.S. economy is now in the hands of a president and a secretary of the treasury who were both born in the Year of the Ox (1961), of which 2009 is another (and which has already started frighteningly with both a solar eclipse and a lunar eclipse).

Some laid-off workers may be desperate to exhibit their work skills at any available job, but February news reports highlighted two government bureaucrats who draw \$250,000 a year between them yet have been prevented from doing a stitch of work for, in one case, up to six years and, in the other, 18 months. Randall Hinton is nominally the chief of investigations for the New York State Insurance Fund but was ostracized by his supervisors in 2002 and has taken home his \$93,000 a year for zero work ever since. U.S. Labor Department official Bob Whitmore earns \$150,000 but has had no work to do since July 2007 due to a clash with his supervisors.

Bigfoot Wallace

started the last stampede of wild buffalo to thunder down Austin's Congress Avenue. In the early days of the Republic of Texas, the capital city had no Capitol. At the time, only wooden stakes with red flags designated where the Main Street of

Wallace was hunting just north of present Downtown when he came upon a group

Texas would one day stretch

down the hill to the river.

of bison. The animals caught his scent and ran toward the future business district with the pioneer in hot pursuit. In their panic, the buffalo were over the hill and between the red flags before they knew it. Blocked by the fluttering red flags from turning, the herd ran off a cliff, swam the river, and disappeared into South Austin.

William Alexander Anderson "Bigfoot" Wallace was 20 years old when he arrived in Galveston in 1837. He experienced an exciting frontier life and lived to tell the tale. He was a Texas Ranger, American Indian fighter, scout, prisoner of war in a Mexican prison, stagecoach driver, and farmer rolled into one folk hero.

In 1954, the citizens of Bigfoot, Texas, built a replica of the pioneer's log cabin that once stood on the banks of the Medina River downstream from Castroville. The museum houses some of Wallace's personal belongings, but his life's story has become a legend unconstrained by walls. Over the years, the museum's collection has grown to include a unique array of other heirlooms.

Originally called Connally's Store, Bigfoot is about nine miles off I-35, east of Devine. Wallace lived the last years of his life on a ranch outside of town.

It was here that biographer A.J. Sowell interviewed an 81-year-old Wallace. The former frontiersman said the nickname originated from an American Indian that once made daring and regular latenight raids on the citizens of Austin. Because of an injury, the American Indian "Bigfoot" left a distinctive large footprint. Wallace trailed him for years, but someone else finally stopped that Bigfoot's depredations.

One night the notorious American Indian was seen prowling around Austin. The next morning a shopkeeper followed the oversize moccasin trail to Wallace's front door. The irate merchant accused Wallace of pulling off a ruse until he put his much smaller foot in the American Indian's footprint. From then on there were two Bigfoots in Texas. Wallace said he preferred the nickname to being called "Lying" Wallace or "Thieving" Wallace.

The Bigfoot Wallace Museum is operated by volunteers who are constantly raising funds for maintenance and repairs with bake sales and barbecues, says Linda Miller, vice president of the local historical society. The museum opens the second Tuesday and second Saturday of each month. On the last Saturday of April, the museum celebrates Bigfoot Wallace's birthday. Three years ago, Wes Allen thought his soccer days were done. A two-sport star at Anderson High, he'd taken a soccer scholarship at Oakland University in Michigan and started every game his freshman year.

He loved the game, but he missed Austin more, and in transferring back home to the University of Texas, which doesn't have a men's team, he came to the sad conclusion that soccer held no future for him.

That was before a buoyant Brit named Phil Rawlins showed up. I'm going to assume Rawlins made pretty good money in high tech sales before taking a flier last January on a professional soccer team, the Austin Aztex. Rawlins is a serious guy who is seriously devoted to the game (he is one of the owners of the Stoke City Football Club, of the English Premier League), but like a lot of soccer enthusiasts, I knew not to get my hopes up. We may play soccer as kids, but few

of us watch it as adults, and league after league has run aground on the shoals of indifference.

And yet, and yet ... a professional soccer team somehow seemed fitting for Austin. Despite the passion for Longhorn football, Austin has a soccer vibe, especially the kind of soccer that Rawlins envisioned, which would be more of a club than just a team, something you join up with as a kid and remain a member of long after your playing days are done.

Anyway, vibe or no vibe, as far as Wes Allen was concerned, any semiserious team seemed a godsend. "This is my chance," he told me a year ago, after making the Aztex Under-23 development squad. "I'm going to run with it."

After the U23 squad won the mid-South division in 2008, Allen was one of three players from the team to get an e-mail in January from Adrian **Heath**. head coach of the Aztex's professional team. Now, when you're offered a sports contract, the thing to do is to hold out for months, refuse to show up for training camp, and generally make an ass of yourself. But that's not how Allen, an econ major at UT, played it. "I just agreed to whatever they offered me," he said.

Which is not to say he doesn't have his sights set on ambitions above and beyond the Aztex - of playing in Major League Soccer or perhaps in Europe.

"I feel like I'm getting closer to that level," he allowed. That may seem a little presumptuous for the center back. After all, so far Allen has only played two professional games, both of them friendly exhibi-

tion matches against teams from the MLS - the New England Revolution and the Houston Dynamo. (The Aztex play their last interleague friendly against the Columbus Crew Saturday and kick off the season a month later, hosting the Minnesota Thunder on April 18.) But something tells me that Rawlins won't begrudge Allen his optimism. After all, Rawlins has some pretty implausible dreams of his own, starting with a soccer-specific Aztex stadium smack in the middle of Downtown Austin.

Here's hoping those dreams come true.

The Austin Aztex were much improved Saturday night, holding the **Houston Dynamo** to a 2-2 draw in the second of their three-game series hosting MLS clubs. The game was lively and fairly physical, with good chances at both ends, and you could start to see the outlines of a regular lineup for the home side. Fences

City Theatre, through March 22
Running time: 2 hr, 20 min

August Wilson is often described as a poet turned playwright. The description fits well with the experience one has when watching his plays. His words turn any scene, from a simple homecoming to a shattering confession, into a poetic distillation of the human experience. And though the words float above everyday language, they remain entirely

accessible. City Theatre Company's production of *Fences* upholds the power of Wilson's writing. It doesn't feel like heightened language; it feels like heightened beauty.

In 1987, August Wilson won the Pulitzer Prize for Fences, one of the 10 plays from his Pittsburgh Cycle, which chronicles the African-American experience throughout the 20th century. Set in 1957, Fences takes place in the yard of the Maxson household, the landscape through which we get to know this cast of interwoven characters. Troy Maxson, the patriarch, is the flawed centerpiece around whom the other characters revolve. His wife, Rose, patiently tends to the home and the people flowing through it. These include Troy's brother, Gabriel, a wounded war veteran who carries a trumpet, believing himself to be an archangel and waiting for the time when he will be called upon to open the gates of heaven; Troy's sons, Lyons and Cory; and Troy's best friend, Bono. Over the course of the story, we see many facets of Troy: brute, bad father, former criminal, lover, friend, hard worker, revolutionary. He threatens his son Cory and forbids him to play football. He ridicules his son Lyons, a musician, and refuses to hear him play. He jokes with his friend Bono. He fights against and breaks through a racial barrier at his place of work, becoming the first black man to be a driver for the garbage-collection company. There is true tenderness between him and Rose, but it crumbles when we learn he has impregnated another woman. When his mistress dies in childbirth, Troy pleads with Rose to help raise the baby girl. Rose tells him, "From right now, this baby's got a mother, but you a womanless man." In the end, we find ourselves at Troy's funeral, where even those with good reason to despise him choose to honor him.



City Theatre Company delivers a strong production of Wilson's drama. The intricate set provides a living, breathing back yard. Lisa Jordon's direction is imperceptible, creating interactions that feel fluid and natural. Only the overly long scene changes and halfhearted attempts at building a fence take one out of this immersive world. The cast works well together, led by the ever-impressive Gina Houston as Rose and Robert Pellette, who delivers a conflicted, passionate, and frightening Troy. Richard Romeo is powerful as Cory, the son who fights to free his own life from his father's shadow. The most transcendent performance of the night is delivered by McArthur Moore, who plays the brother/angel/fool/prophet Gabriel. He roams the stage, singing, barking at hellhounds, and talking about his friend St. Peter. The character bursts in at odd moments, and each and every time, the stage lights up with Moore's presence. His fight to get his brother's soul into heaven will most likely leave you teary-eyed.

Gabriel's fight is the final image of the play. Though Troy is dead, Cory is still angry with his father. He doesn't want to attend the funeral. Rose chides him for his disrespect. She explains that Troy did the best he could with the life he was given. And now that is what Cory must do: live his own life and find his own way. Gabriel enters and tells Rose it is time. Gabriel attempts to blow his trumpet for St. Peter, but the trumpet makes no sound. Tossing the broken instrument aside, Gabriel shouts and shouts until those pearly gates are flung wide for his brother's imperfect soul. It is a heart-wrenching demonstration of love, the culmination of an admirable performance, and the completion of a powerful night of theatre. - Hannah Kenah



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Heroes

Larry L. King Theatre at Austin Playhouse, through March 15 Running time: 1 hr, 30 min



Heroes is a play about three men in the twilight of their years, living out their final days on the terrace of a home for old soldiers. Every day they sit together, bickering and debating their limited futures in the company of a stone statue of a dog.

The setup seems ripe for cliché, for mockery of the elderly, and for lame jokes at the expense of old men's quiet lives. Yet the script by Gérald Sibleyras, translated by Tom Stoppard, does not fall into those traps. The play is called *Hero*es because these men have proven themselves to be exactly that. The play takes place in 1959 in the French countryside, and these three characters first fought in the brutal trenches of World War I and then lived through the occupation of World War II. One of them, Phillipe, carries shrapnel in his head to this day, and another, Henri, has a lame leg.

They talk about things other than war, though. Why talk about war when it's understood that all of them have seen it? Instead, they decide it's time to plot a new conquest, one that will take them on foot beyond the cemetery at the gates of the old soldiers home, all the way to the line of poplar trees at the horizon. Clearly it's an impossibility, but each of them discovers a new motivation for moving from day to day as they plan for their ridiculous journey.

Heroes is a witty but quiet play. Its appeal lies in the way it portrays the secluded life. From where these men sit, we can see how the outside world takes on a special qual-

ity when there is no longer any commerce between the cloister and what lies beyond its walls. Fantasies grow unfettered as old men debate strategies for seducing beautiful young women, and one of them, Gustave, decides that he will carry the 200-pound dog with them on their journey to the poplar trees.

Director Lara Toner takes the cast through the play gracefully. As Phillipe, David Stahl is especially endearing. Stahl knows how to balance his character against the other two, carrying small thoughts through moments of silence and using stillness to his advantage. As Gustave, Austin Playhouse Artistic Director Don Toner seems to resist his character, retaining a shade too much of his own spryness, and Michael Stuart's prop cane is not always his friend. Together, however, the three actors build a strong ensemble.

With a 90-minute play about the adventures of three old men in failing health, the ending might be obvious. Sibleyras knows that we know what will happen to them, however, and *Hero*es takes us to a slightly different place. It's an easy and perhaps forced tableau, but it serves as a gentle waiting place for that stretch of time before the inevitable comes to pass. – *Elizabeth Cobbe*





Haven Gallery & Fine Gifts

This year, I had the pleasure of getting on the bus for the annual Art Night Austin event put on by Art Alliance Austin. Buses stopped at Arthouse, the Austin Museum of Art, and several commercial galleries, with each venue featuring food

from local restaurants to go with the art on display. I admit that I had no idea what was in Haven Gallery & Fine Gifts, and I am here to say it has good fine art in it; it's not all gifts. And if you go in looking for a gift, beware; you might come out with a piece of art for yourself. The gallery is crowded with items, and with some parsing, you can find some real gems.

Haven has more small-scale sculpture on display than other galleries in town. The wide range of items includes mosaics, wood, ceramics, bronzes, found objects, and blown glass. A blown-glass vase in off-whites and clear glass made by Leigh Taylor Wyatt of Wimberley caught my eye. Its lozenge shapes and stripes give it a stylish Seventies vibe, even though it's quite shiny and new.

The quality of all the ceramic work here is good. I was sucked in by some white porcelain sculptural lamps, particularly *Large Coral Reef Light*, by Canadian artist Lilach Lotan. I enjoy its repeated oceanic barnacle shapes and its matte finish. Its simplicity and white color is relaxing and allows me to look at the neat inner glow and transparencies within the form as whole. Some of these delicate and well-made lamps look like ruffles, and some look like barnacles, but they all provide a burst of texture. As I

wandered around, I noticed Lotan's humorous side on display in vases that have a zipper carved into them, opening up the tops of the vessels. These are similarly understated in solid black or white but contain a surrealist or pop aesthetic.

I was happy to see Darvin Jones had a couple of his pop-art paintings up as well. These look a bit like graphic design, but he can paint happy "la grunge" if he wants. (That's the trend where you overlay lots of fonts, drips, and swirls to create a shape, like the drippy Comedy Central logo.) Jones uses a limited palette of mostly blue and white and creates some soft movements across the composition.

Hung in the same room and also blue are Rebecca Bennett's monochromatic abstracted landscapes. In paintings such as *Morning Mist*, a wet-on-wet oil on canvas, the layers of gradations from dark Prussian to robin's egg are evenhanded, and the surface texture is pleasingly consistent. It's mindless in a dreamy Zen way.

The gallery does a nice job of mixing styles and types of artwork, all handmade but not all local. Its displays are well put together in small, almost themed groupings. It's nice to see a shop with paintings and sculpture at inspirational prices.



SXSW 09 Film Festival

It seems the entire world knows when enough is enough that is, all the world except the programmers of the 2009 edition of the South by Southwest Film Festival, whose wide and varied selections will flood our screens over the next nine days. Happily, Hollywood has pitched in (inadvertently) to make our lives simpler this year: None of the three movies opening in wide release in Austin today was screened in

advance for anyone with a deadline to make. Usually, such studio shenanigans spark my ire. Moreover, I can't remember another week in which the *Chronicle* was unable to run *any* new reviews of the movies opening in town that week. But this Friday the 13th I'm counting my blessings: The studios have seemingly conspired to allow us to devote our full attention to the SXSW Film Festival.

So, plunge on in. The Screens features in this week's Chronicle (beginning on p.53) offer some close-up looks at several of the films in this year's Fest. However, keep in mind, the stories represent but a fraction of the Festival goings-on. Look for more coverage and reviews in the next two issues of the Chronicle, as well as online and in the print dailies, which come out during the companion Music Festival. Inevitably, there will still be much left unsaid and unseen the Festival is just that extensive. Use the Chronicle pieces, SXSW's advertising insert in this issue, and www.sxsw.com as entry points for exploration. Ultimately, you need to don your explorer's cap and go forth armed with information, instinct, and gut feelings.

It's helpful to pay attention to the categories in which the films are listed. Narrative, documentaries, and shorts are obvious distinctions, but note that many of the offerings are competition films (and, for equality's

sake, nothing screening in competition is covered in this advance issue). Music-connected films show in 24 Beats per Second and the Music Videos sections; go macro with the SX Global sidebar or micro with the Lone Star States films; midnight movies are well-represented with their own Festival section and a new series called SXSW Presents Fantastic Fest at Midnight. Additionally, there are several screenings hosted by members of the Austin Media Arts Committee, where programs of short films by local organization members will be shown. These all screen at the Hideout Theatre through Tuesday, and the groups showing work there include the Austin School of Film, the Austin Film Society, and Reel Women.

Austin Fest-goers who are not Conference badge holders can sometimes feel overwhelmed by information overload and the general street commotion. SXSW this year has prepared a couple of nifty videos that explain, in easy terms, the distinctions among the various venues and line-up information. (These can been found in the righthand column at www.sxw.com/film.) In general, the biggest venues are the Paramount Theatre and the Austin Convention Center theatre, and these are often your best bets for admission, although Wednesday through Saturday much of the crowd gravitates toward the start of the Music Festival, thereby thinning the Film Festival crowds by a smidge. Single-admission tickets cost \$10; a Festival pass is \$70. The pass-holders line is granted entry to the theatres before the single-admission line, and the Film pass is a bargain if you plan to see seven or more films. This year's addition of a shuttle bus between theatres (Friday-Tuesday only) will be open to pass holders as well as badge holders – another plus to purchasing a pass.

You'll have a chance to view some soon-to-be-released movies (*I Love You, Man* and 500 Days of Summer, among others) and see famous stars (everyone from Paul Rudd to Hal Holbrook, Sam Rockwell to Zooey Deschanel, and more) and directors (Kathryn Bigelow and Spike Lee, to name but a couple). Even more exciting are the films by unknowns that draw you in with nothing but a poster or a plot description. You'll be able to find me at *For the Love of Movies: The Story of American Film Criticism* by longtime Boston critic Gerald Peary, whose movie is the first to pin down a history of the practice, or scarfing down special mushroom pizza at the *Know Your Mushrooms* screening, giving new meaning to going with your gut. Next week, it's back to viewing whatever Hollywood dishes out, so grab your wild cards while you can. — *Marjorie Baumgarten* Alamo Ritz, Alamo Drafthouse South, Austin Convention Center Theatre, Paramount, Hideout Theatre

THE CLASS D: Laurent Cantet; with François Bégaudeau, Rachel Régulier, Esméralda Ouertani, Franck Keita, Wei Huang. (PG-13, 128 min., subtitled)

The gulf that sometimes emerges between meaning well and doing well is just one of the sharply observed human experiences illuminated in this French classroom drama. . When the best-laid lesson plans fail, liberal-minded teachers faced with insolent-by-nature adolescents can find themselves choking on their pedagogical ideals, while students can find their hopes for academic progress derailed by distractibility, inattention, self-disciplinary deficiencies, and lowered expectations. The kinetic and perceptive realism of The Class forges a bare narrative that seeks no winners or losers. Winner of the Palme d'Or last year at Cannes. the film depicts a French-language class in a Parisian junior high school in which virtually all the students are of African, Caribbean, Asian, and Arab backgrounds. The Class is based on François Bégaudeau's 2006 novel, Entre les Murs, which encapsulates the teacher's year in the classroom Bégaudeau also stars in the film as the teacher, and all the students who appear in his French class are also nonprofessionals. CONFESSIONS OF A SHOPAHOLIC

The girl can't help it: The shopaholic character, Rebecca Bloomwood (Fisher), may be the invention of Sophie Kinsella's bestselling novels, but onscreen the character appears to be an immaculate conception born of Bridget Jones and the ladies from Sex and the City. Many have rued the luck of Confessions' unfortunate release date, worrying that the film's celebration of conspicuous consumption occurs just as our national consumption has fizzled into anything but conspicuous. That's hardly the problem with Confessions of a Shopaholic, however. No, the problem nipping at the designer heels of Confessions is not the state of the economy but, rather, the film's predictability. What distinguishes this movie from other interchangeable Renée Zellweger/ Kate Hudson/Sandra Bullock career-girl rom-coms is the luminous presence of Isla Fisher. Just as 3-D is heralded as the newest old trick in the cinema showman's grab bag, along comes Coraline - the first animated stop-motion feature to be created in 3-D - to remind us that there can be more than mere gimmickry in the souped-up imagery. Writerdirector Selick (James and the Giant Peach and Tim Burton's The Nightmare Before Christmas) again demonstrates his unparalleled mastery of the phantasmagoric image. Selick adapted Coraline for stop-motion screen puppets from versatile author Neil Gaiman's prize-winning young-adult novel. The storyline is a classic "grass is always greener" fable that perfectly reflects a child's provenance of whims and fears. Particularly at the end, when the ghosts of missing children enter the picture, Coraline may prove unsuitably macabre for the youngest viewers. Defiance is the true story of the Bielski family, three Jewish brothers who, in 1941, escaped into the forest of their native Belarus to elude capture by the Nazis, set up a small ad hoc village, and ended up saving more than 1,200 Jewish lives through daring rescue raids and armed resistance. The story, in other words, is pure Hollywood gold, full of opportunities for stirring speeches, ethical quandaries, lessons about tolerance and humanity, and violence against Nazis. Zwick (Glory, Blood Diamond) has spent his entire career struggling to find the balance between opposing impulses - the sentimentalist's desire for emotional-historical heft and the artist's fascination with conflicted humanity – a struggle that's all over Defiance. Standing in for the first impulse is composer James Newton Howard, who never met a tender moment he didn't want to choke to death, but representing the second, thankfully, are Craig and Schreiber, who are more interested in psychological ambivalence than unblemished heroism. DOUBT D: John Patrick Shanley; with Meryl Streep, Philip Seymour Hoffman, Amy Adams, Viola Davis, Joseph Foster II. (PG-13, 104 min.)

Shanley adapted his Pulitzer- and Tony Awardwinning play, Doubt, for the movies and also chose to direct the film. The cast he gathered is peerless, but unfortunately, the actors don't all behave as though they're performing in the same movie. A collection of acting styles, from the broad to the contained and the exacting to the unrestrained, creates an unevenness of tone and interpretation. Streep plays Sister Aloysius, the unwavering principal of the St. Nicholas school, into whose dominion comes the new young priest, Father Flynn (Hoffman). The ensuing struggle between the two over morality and power carries with it all the baggage of Catholic tradition and hierarchy, as well as the period's secular strife between men and women. It's a cerebral tug-of-war for the viewer, a struggle that's made only more opaque with the film's closing line of dialogue. Meanwhile, storms suddenly stir up outside, and lightbulbs repeatedly burst in Shanley's effort to cinematically underline the pent-up emotions within. (12/26/2008) - Mariorie Baumgarten

If you've seen Wedding Crashers, then, for all intents and purposes, you've already seen Fired Up - because this new movie borrows from the 2005 Vince Vaughn/Owen Wilson hit with such utter shamelessness, you have to wonder if royalty checks are already in the mail. Here's the recipe: Take two best friends, one laid-back and charming (D'Agosto), the other smarmy and verbose (Olsen). Show them, in extended montage sequences, to be the unrepentant, unremitting Lotharios of their social sphere (in this case, high school), bedding women with ease and moving on without a hint of conscience, remorse, or romantic sentiment. Plop them into an unfamiliar social setting they believe will be beneficial to their lives as belt-notching philanderers (say, cheerleading camp). Have the laid-back one fall in love, against his better judgment; the smarmy one, meanwhile, should lecture the laid-back one about the dangers of falling in love while finding himself agitated by a gay stereotype or two. Stir in scatology, snarky observations, and a few dozen pop-culture references that pass for jokes; mix well with life lessons and some lowgrade existential collapse: and voilà!: a movie. Frost/Nixon is a behind-the-scenes account of the momentous interviews with Richard Nixon conducted by British TV personality David Frost in 1977, three years after the former president had resigned from office in disgrace. The film is adapted for the screen by Peter Morgan from his play and stars the play's two leads: Langella (who also won a Tony for this role) as Nixon and Sheen as Frost. Almost by definition, Frost/Nixon is a two-handed work, a psychological boxing match between the two protagonists, and Langella and Sheen, the actors, are evenly matched. Each man also counts a few coaches and assistants in his corner, making the taped interviews seem all the more like a prizefight. Frost/Nixon, like Morgan's The Queen, is at its best when it's examining the fragile intersection of media and politics. On its own, however, I'm not sure that this story of Frost's chutzpah and Nixon's intractability is inherently that gripping. (12/26/2008) - Marjorie Baumgarten

As director, Eastwood's usual economical yet efficacious style marks the film, but it is his performance that is really the heart of this show. Still lithe and taut in his movement, Eastwood nevertheless allows his aging body to sag in places and fail him on occasion. Eastwood also finds the humorous aspects of the character heard often in the instinctive growl the character directs toward all annoyances, be they his own money-grubbing family members, gangbangers, or the neighborhood priest. But for every genuine moment of relationship insight the script proffers (and there are a few nuggets of gold), there are another five wincing examples of female delusion and hysteria. And how come none of these women appears to have anything to talk about other than how to get a man? These are funny, smart, good-looking gals. The question at the heart of The Reader is what have we learned (and forgotten) from history's bloody backwash? Luckily for The Reader, the angelic Ganz, as a sage professor of law, is on hand to nudge the question of wartime culpability to the fore. But that's not what's most remarkable about The Reader, it's just what's most intellectually chewy. The real red meat of Daldry's film is the May-December romance between a weary-looking, sexually rapacious streetcar ticket-taker (Winslet, shockingly good throughout) in postwar Berlin and the sickly young schoolboy (an enthusiastic, excellent Kross) on whom she initially takes pity and then seduces, ravenously and to his great delight. One day she's gone, with no explanation, and the boy grows into a promising young law student and, later, into a sorrowful-seeming Fiennes. Daldry, working from a superior script by David Hare, has crafted a film about guilt, love, and history and how the three skeins create human beings or, alternately, human monsters. A seductive opening scene introduces Frank (DiCaprio) and April (Winslet), before they've married and moved to Revolutionary Road. There's an airlessness to Mendes' picture that doesn't leave much room for error. One slight bobble from the (admittedly very good) leads, and the illusion crumbles. Slumdog Millionaire is a mad, thrilling, and perversely luminous film. It may be drenched in the saffron and violet palettes of its Mumbai setting, but it plays like a classic Hollywood rags-to-riches love story, albeit one with Bollywood roots and a fully globalized desire to survive, succeed, live, and love within the teeming megalopolis formerly known as Bombay. It's a natural fit for Boyle and director of photography Anthony Dod Mantle. Mumbai is nothing if not giddy chaos incarnate. Patel, in his feature debut, is the "slumdog" of the title, a reed-thin young striver named Jamal Malik. Jamal has managed to

survive the crushing poverty and daily tragedies of his birthplace and has somehow landed himself on the Hindi version of Who Wants to Be a Millionaire?. I can honestly say I've never been more confused in a theatre than I was while watching Tyler Perry's Madea Goes to Jail. And not because Madea doesn't actually go to jail until the film is almost over (though also that); I just couldn't find a way to reconcile the comic absurdity of Mable "Madea" Simmons (Perry) – the sassy, crass, belligerent, bawdy, self-righteous, over-the-top, l-can't-believe-shejust-said-that center of the Perry multimedia empire (with outposts on television and Broadway) - with the maudlin melodrama of Candace Washington, a twentysomething drug addict and streetwalker played by Pulliam (The Cosby Show's Rudy, another image I couldn't quite get my head around), who is a lifelong victim of sexual and emotional violence. It's as if Perry took Big Momma's House, slapped it together with The Accused, closed his eyes, and prayed for coherence. Waltz With Bashir is a dreamy, animated psychodocumentary about the attempt of director Folman to recall, exactly, what role - if any - he played in the massacre of Palestinian civilians (most of whom were women and children) at the Sabra and Shatila refugee camps in Beirut in 1982. At the time, Folman was a raw young soldier and the Israeli army was invading the Lebanese capital. Twenty years later, Folman realizes he has no memory of his participation in those bloody events and sets off to track down and interview his former comrades in hopes of reconstructing what really happened, yet none seem to agree on what happened: when, to whom, and why. Waltz With Bashir uses the actual voices of the men who were there, which lends this quasi-documentary a visceral punch. While scrupulously faithful in nearly every regard (save the ending) to writer Alan Moore and artist Dave Gibbons' landmark DC Comics series (which ran from 1986 to '87 before being collected into a single-volume graphic novel), the film itself is bizarrely cold and uninvolving. Snyder's film is as meaty an adaptation of this meta-comic as we're ever likely to see, but it never quite clicks, and I think that has everything to do with both the medium and the contemporary world we live in. Simply put, Watchmen the comic is, as it turns out, unfilmable, and so what we're left with are the comic panels made mobile, the dialogue spoken aloud, but none of the visceral punch that comes from discovering the comic firsthand. Watchmen is beautifully designed, stoically paced in the finest film-noir tradition, and awash in arresting imagery, but it never manages to make the exquisite emotional connection the comic so handily does. Those looking for a grand discourse on the suffering nobility of the aging pseudo-athlete in modern, youth-obsessed America will probably go away disappointed. Aronofsky and screenwriter Robert Siegel are less interested in tragedy than they are the intimacy that develops between men engaged in close-contact battle and the contrivances needed to make that contact look as "real" as possible. Together they create innumerable fascinating moments that have the air of documentary truth. But let's be honest: The story of the waning athlete, the stripper he loves, and the daughter he left behind is an old one, and if The Wrestler is ever in danger of slipping into sentimentality, it's here. VOLUNTEER LEGAL SERVICES -FREE WEEKLY LEGAL CLINIC

My friend told me there is a free legal clinic where I can get free legal advice - is that true? When is it, and where do I go?

Yes. Volunteer Legal Services of Central Texas, in partnership with Texas RioGrande Legal Aid, provides two free legal advice and intake clinics each week. The clinic is designed to help low-income folks with their civil legal problems. Advice is given only on civil, not criminal, matters.

The clinics are held every Monday and Wednesday night (except on holidays or during school breaks) at two different local middle schools. The Monday night clinic is held at Martin middle school (1601 Haskell St.). The Wednesday night clinic is held at Webb middle school (601 E. St. Johns). Child care, Spanish translation, security, and free parking are provided.

VLS recommends that you arrive between 6pm and 7pm. It's important that you come during this time window as no one is allowed to enter the school before 6pm (for security reasons) and anyone arriving after 7pm will be asked to come back to another clinic.

When you arrive, you'll be divided into one of two groups - those needing help with family law matters and those needing help with any other noncriminal matters. You will be asked to fill out a basic form asking for more information about you and your case. This form will be reviewed by the attorney before you start talking with him or her. Be prepared to give a short overview of your problem. As hundreds of people come to the clinics each week, the attorneys can often only spend 10-15 minutes with each person. The attorney who talks with you is agreeing only to give you advice and is not going to represent you in your case. Folks who are financially eligible may also be able to apply for free legal services from Texas RioGrande Legal Aid at the clinics, although due to limited legal resources, there is no guarantee that an attorney will take the case.

TIRES DO HAVE A SHELF LIFE

Dear Tom and Ray:

I have a 1995 Buick Regal that I purchased new before I retired. I drive the car approximately once a month. The car has 55,000 miles and is always kept in the garage. My question is about tires. The tires are the original Goodyears. They appear to be in excellent condition except for some very minor cupping. Should the tires be replaced because of the age?

RAY: Unfortunately, yes. There are some things that wear out only when you use them. That's why my brother's work clothes are still brand spankin' new.

TOM: But there are other things that degrade over time, whether you use them or not. Rubber is one of those things. It's degraded by ozone in the air. And over time, it dries out and cracks and loses its pliability.

RAY: Some people say: "Well, to protect your tires and make them last longer, you should pay money to have them filled with nitrogen instead of air. Texas did away with its prison rodeo back in 1986. It wasn't because Texans drank the PETA punch and had some sort of animal rights epiphany. No, believe it or not, the state of Texas was reacting to budgetary shortages that resulted from a sudden collapse in oil prices in 1986 (yes, this isn't the first time Texas has been the economy's prison bitch). In 1986 the rodeo arena in Huntsville needed repair, and the Lege just wasn't willing to cough up the half-mil needed to fix it. Think about that for a minute. Remember the Frisbee golf course on the city of Austin's economic stimulus package wish list? That was going to clock in at nearly \$900,000 ... but it was going to create four new jobs, thereby taking the same number of perpetually baked trustafarians off the street to man the clubhouse and keep the squirrels from making the beast with two backs in the disc baskets (or "pole holes," as they're referred to by their glossy-eyed users). A prison rodeo arena, on the other hand, wouldn't create any new jobs, because all the employees work for free, unless you count the "I Got Fatally Gored in the Texas Prison Rodeo and All I Got Was This Stupid Bloody T-Shirt" T-shirts the losers received as a consolation prize. Besides, no legislator of sound mind is going to spend money on something that benefits an education and recreation fund for prisoners, no matter how popular or entertaining it is. Thus, Texans, in 1986, were deprived of the brutal spectacle of prison rodeo. Nowadays, if you want to see prisoners tossed around like a rag doll by a 2,000-pound bull, you'll need to go to either McAlester, Okla., or Angola ... not the one in Africa but the one in an even stranger and scarier place: Louisiana. Oklahoma at least has a reasonable claim on rodeo culture: Will Rogers, Gene Autry, Lane Frost, Freckles Brown. Louisiana? Maybe alligator-skin boots? Throwing a Cajun in a rodeo ring without a frog gig, fishing pole, or broken Budweiser longneck to defend himself is cruel sport indeed: fascinating, gory, heartbreaking - similar to feeding Christians to lions - but it ain't rodeo. On the other hand, Oklahomans familiarity with the genus Bovinae makes even hardcore Texans a bit uncomfortable. It's only natural they would pony up with a prison rodeo of their own ... which they did, a scant nine years after Texas started throwing its convicts to the bulls in 1931, Oklahoma followed suit. They're still at it 68 years later, and to spice things up, they added chicks to the mix a few years ago. Backward as they may seem, at least Okies aren't sexist when it comes to exploiting their inmates by subjecting them to senseless violence. Is it worth the drive? Maybe not, especially when you can head over to the Paramount on Saturday for the 11am world premiere of Sweethearts of the Prison Rodeo, a documentary about the Oklahoma Prison Rodeo by acclaimed Okie filmmaker Bradley Beesley, whose previous works include Flaming Lips documentary The Fearless Freaks and the definitive primer on barehanded sport fishing, Okie Noodling.
