New Jersey Reverie

Autumn rain, returning memories

"The banality of evil," as Hannah Arendt described it, is both terrifying and depressing, but the mundanity of the poetic can be exhilarating.

It's all about what you do with whatever comes your way.

1) New Jersey

My mother ran out of the gas in the middle of the Holland Tunnel, driving from New Jersey to New York City, twice. The second time, though it was some years after the first, the police seemed almost happy to see her, despite the fact that she had run out well into the tunnel, stalling traffic

in both directions. Evidently, not many people have run out of gas in the middle of the Holland Tunnel, and I'm not sure anyone else has ever done it twice.

It turned out she was wellremembered and not nearly as badly thought of as one might assume. At least one of the times I was with her in the car. Memory blurs naturally, but storytelling blurs memory more.

The Holland Tunnel has two tubes that run from New York City to New Jersey. Usually, to get there, we'd drive down the New Jersey turnpike to the exit for the tunnel, which was then a short drive through Jersey City. As memory serves (not always ably), one would come down around a curve to see the Hudson River ahead. The road followed the curve, sweeping down and around to feed into the tunnel below. If traffic was stop-and-go when one hit the curve or beforehand, you knew it was going to be a long, hideous journey.

Traveling on the New Jersey turnpike, which famously topped the list of worst highways in America time and time again some decades back, was the worst way to begin any trip. (A list of most dangerous highways might seem a bit macabre, but plaintiffs' attorneys collect

them with the same enthusiasm others bring to baseball cards and Golden Age comics.) The rest of the journey did not improve.

Not long after the car ran out of gas, waiting for the police, my mother pointed out to me that the situation could be much, much worse. Embarrassed, but not nearly as much as I should have been, I was sinking into my seat, as was my habit on all occasions, especially when it was likely or certain that shortly we would be talking to other people. Still, I went for the bait. "How?" I asked.

"Your father could be in the car behind us," she answered.

The police were absolutely festive the second time, as though Mom had won a long-distance desert race or managed to win a Guinness World Record. There were any number of police and other Holland Tunnel officials who remembered her well. Evidently, at least at the time, there was very little turnover in those working at the tunnel.

The family treated the incident in many

ways, though far more with nonchalance than anything else. We were a family that expected, created, perceived, and experienced the absurd. Not the spiritually holy and cosmically comedic absurdity of J.D. Salinger's Glass family, nor that of Wes Anderson's more troubled but also overly wealthy Tenenbaums: Ours had a far more mundane tenor. Still, we did not walk through this world lightly, living our lives quietly, nor did we show much restraint.

Therefore, though abstractly, this image of a car stuck in a tunnel could represent my family coat of arms (my parents being first-generation Americans, there is precious little family history and certainly no formal coat of arms). We were not wealthy, overly artistic, unusually brilliant, inherently charismatic, or any of the more attractive forms of idiosyncrasy. The family motto to accompany this coat of arms could be something like "Never Just Once" - in Latin, of course.

More appropriately, my personal motto could easily be the title of one of Dan O'Neill's collections of the Odd Bodkins comic strip: Hear the Sound of My Feet Walking.. Drown the Sound of My Voice Talking ...

This is neither privileging failure nor celebrating annoyance. It is the story of idiosyncratic people determined to travel the trails that they've chosen at their own speeds and in their own ways. Fear, even though often expected, was to be avoided, while success was to be relished. But most important was always being open to experience, contributing to the community, and living with integrity.

For the record, I have two sisters. One is a vice president in the legal department of a major film studio, and the other is a wellknown educator and administrator.

2) Autumn Rains

Time passes; things are remembered and others forgotten, which has nothing to do with my family but with a more gentle, mimetic absurdity.

It was raining. They were sitting on the back porch; she smoked one cigarette after another. She was talking. He was listening. There was not nor ever would be anything romantic between them.

She was off on a marvelous jag, speed rapping, Lenny Bruce-style word scatting, offering observations, swinging from topic to topic: her past, love, what she did and didn't believe. Sitting there, he couldn't help smiling, but still he wondered whether this was madness or poetry.

Almost but not exactly at the same time, in a different city, a friend of his is in bed in his hotel suite, reading. Outside, it is raining. In the room, without really listening, he hears her in the next bed gently breathing. She is just and only a friend.

Our 29th anniversary was Sept. 4, and after its passing, we decided to start celebrating our 30th year right away. It's all still evolving, but here's what we have going so

far: We're republishing the first year's issues online every two weeks (that's how often we published for the first seven years), running vintage ads from some of our original advertisers in the paper and challenging readers to spot the old ad, and compiling lists of 30 notable (or laughable or lamentable) takes on the Chronicle's coverage, culture, and commentary from the past three decades. 3) The Banality of Evil

Be alert to those who tell you all mistakes are made on purpose, all of the government is corrupt, and that those who disagree with their ideas are evil. They are encouraging hate. They are encouraging you to kill.

To be a foolish hero in the emptiest of all revolutions, the one against us, is not to be heroic or even decent at all.

4) The Mundane and the Poetic

Now, mostly, I sit quietly, watching TV. It wasn't better then, but it was different. I try to sleep, without much success. Tonight, when I couldn't, I found myself remembering a night in New Jersey. Not one involving the Holland Tunnel or my mother, but a good night nevertheless.

I found Michael King's article "Point Austin" [News, Sept. 17] to be misleading and unhelpful.

While ultimately mentioning the good work of Austin Pets Alive!, the article seemed to give outsized credit for the current lower kill rate at the Town Lake Animal Center to the ASPCA, Austin Humane Society, and TLAC itself. These groups have been around forever, and certainly when the kill rate was much higher, and none of them politically advocated for the recent city resolution to become no-kill. Simultaneously, King failed to acknowledge that vanguard no-kill advocacy groups such as FixAustin and Austin Pets Alive! (and the animal lovers they inspired) were the ones who pushed for radical change that has resulted in the city's current new resolution to become no-kill and the current lower kill rate.

The article also prominently featured criticism of outsourcing and Austin Pets Alive! by an ASPCA advocate. But the ASPCA has not pushed politically for Austin to be no-kill and is not offering to take on the task to make Austin no-kill. So why do they get to sit around and criticize other groups that want to make it happen?

SEX OFFENDERS HAVE REAL VICTIMS

Dear Editor,

The article "Sex Offenders Exposed" [News, Sept. 10] is completely one-sided. Why are there so many who are willing to gamble with the innocence of a child? The typical child molester has 117 victims, most of which do not report what happened. This is one of the most underreported crimes there is. The problems this article talks about seem to be due to the wording of the laws and not the registry itself. We all start off as a stranger while we are getting to know a person, so why wouldn't the registry provide useful information during that time? The Adam Walsh Act states that Tier I offenders have to register for 15 years, Tier II for 25 years, and Tier III for life. However, the state can decide to shorten the registration length according to the tier system for having a clean record for a certain amount of time and for completing certain programs. I believe the "risk assessment tools" that are currently being used are not accurate.

There are real victims behind these sex offenders, whose lives are forever changed and who will never be able to apply to have that part of their lives fixed. Victims are told to be silent and to not talk about what we have been through. It's not right to ask that we return to the silence where abuse thrives because it's inconvenient to others. Articles like yours say that the victims of these crimes aren't important enough to make sure that fixes are done properly and minimize our suffering. But it does say, "Let's just use that same broad brush that we're complaining about to set almost all of the sex offenders free from the registry list." Where would be the justice in that? There wouldn't be. Regards.

[News Editor Michael King responds: As the story points out, the inclusion of many less serious or even dubious offenses among serious crimes makes real crime victims more vulnerable, not less so. Moreover, the "117 victims per molester" statistic, ubiquitous on the Internet, has no known foundation in research. It would mean, for example, that the 1,500 registered Austin offenders would have more than 175,000 victims, nearly a quarter of the entire population. Nationally, as one researcher notes, "If all 700,000 registered offenders had 100 to 300 victims like the myth claims, there would be around 70 to 280 million victims. The USA only has 300 million individuals and around 70 million minors."]



WHAT PEDOBEAR REPRESENTS


In all honesty, I don't know what Pedobear is. An icon, a mascot, a meme – and I didn't know what that was until I looked it up – a pedophile in disguise, a warning against a pedophile, something that started good and is being perverted – the answer depends on who you ask.

I do know, however, what Pedobear represents: our darkest, deepest, most visceral fears and the monster in the dark on which we hang all those fears, the ubiquitous sex offender.

Police departments have issued warnings, releasing elaborate bulletins detailing the inherent dangers. Well-meaning (I assume) journalists have written articles and posted blogs doing the same. One cute little thing wrote, "You never know who is behind the mask," and in so doing inadvertently hit at the heart of the matter; the emphasis for child sexual assault is still where it has always been, on "stranger danger." Even if Pedobear were indeed a "cover-up" for predators, it would still be true that less than 1% of sexual crimes against children are committed by released, registered sex offenders. Less than 10% are committed by a stranger.

"The research showed that almost half (49%) of youth under age six and 42% of children ages six to 11 were sexually assaulted by a family member and another 44% by family acquaintances" (Bureau of Justice Statistics).

City Council

meets today, Thursday, Sept. 23, with a lengthy, if not terribly contentious, agenda: Regulations for **food trucks** and trailers are on tap, along with a discussion of **social-ser**-



vice contracts and form-based code zoning along **Airport Boulevard**. Next week, Sept. 30, council leaves City Hall to hold its meeting in the Boyd Vance Theatre at the **Carver Museum and Cultural Center** in East Austin.

- Austin missed out on the first round of a Promise Neighborhood planning grant, intended to tackle child poverty and academic underachievement. The U.S. Department of Education this week named 21 winners that will split \$10 million, but neither of Austin's two applicants – Austin Achievement Zone and East Austin Children's Promise – made the list. (See "Promises, Promises," Aug. 6.)
- Construction work on a Waller Creek foot bridge will prompt its temporary closure, starting Sept. 27. The widening job requires rerouting a chunk of the Lady Bird Lake trail near Red River and Rainey and closing the bridge from 9am to 4pm weekdays through October. Things get more complicated after that, so check out www.cityofaustin.org/wallercreek for specifics.
- Full Throttle Productions LP, the firm behind the planned Formula 1 race track in southeast Travis County, has released its site master plan, which includes a seminar building, driving club, and kart track. But due to county road planners' concerns about traffic tangles outside the race site, promoters have hired traffic management firm Kimley-Horn and Associates Inc. and Graham Lake-Grange of Global Strategic Outcomes to steer things straight.
- Austin Community College broke another enrollment record this semester, reporting 44,100 credit students this fall, a nearly 10% increase over 2009 figures. Similarly, ACC hit a milestone with Hispanic enrollment, which now exceeds 25% of credit students; if it continues at this pace, ACC officials say, the college would become eligible for additional federal funding.
- Are you a registered voter? If not, better move fast: Registration for the Nov. 2 election closes Oct. 4. Visit www.traviscountytax.org for more information.
- After refusing to commit to a debate with former Houston mayor and gubernatorial candidate Bill White, Gov. Rick Perry did end up sharing the stage with his Democratic challenger – sort of. On Sept. 20, the two attended a forum in Houston sponsored by Arab-American Voters, a Houstonbased nonprofit. Perry made his exit after his prepared remarks, while White stayed for a Q&A.
- The first wave of **health care reforms** takes effect today, Sept. 23. Among the changes: Children will be able to join or remain on their parents' insurance policy until age 26, lifetime coverage limits will be phased out, and children with pre-existing conditions can no longer be denied health coverage.

The things they won't tell you in Texas schools

Molly Ivins often noted that persistent observers of Texas politics learn one invaluable lesson: Things can always get worse. I've been reminded of this nugget of wisdom by a couple of stories in the news this week. First, there's the absurd resolution pending before the State Board of Education that Texas public school textbooks are too favorable

toward Islam and biased against Christianity, and therefore the board needs to act to prevent this continuing outrage. Secondly, there's the ongoing attempt by Williamson County District Attorney John Bradley to make certain that the state's Forensic Science Commission – upon which he was imposed as chair by Gov. Rick Perry – discontinue any attempts to actually do its job, which is to review and

reform the dismal condition of much of the state's supposedly scientific investigations of crime.

Maybe you missed the big news that the Lubbock City Council is just moments away from imposing Shariah within city limits, and the Waxahachie council of elders is seriously considering requiring all female residents to wear burquas – just in time for the fall fashion season. That makes about as much sense as the willingness of the SBOE to seriously consider a resolution – proposed by a defeated Odessa SBOE candidate, no less – to end the "pro-Islamic/anti-Christian distortions in social studies texts." This ingrained textbook bias no doubt accounts for the thousands of Texas students arriving at high school as devout Baptists and Methodists and brisket aficionados, only to depart four years

later as dedicated adherents of Islam – having somehow acquired heathen tastes for hummus, falafel, and non-American football.

Next thing you know, River Citians, they'll be taking up pool instead of billiards.

Like much of what the board does, the whole matter would be laughable, except that it is part and parcel of the current nationwide, venomous racial hysteria

against anything considered "Muslim" or Arabic. The madness ranges from politically manufactured outrage over a "Ground Zero Mosque" that is neither at Ground Zero nor a mosque to copycat actions, some involving literally terrorizing violence, against mosques elsewhere. At its absolute worst, the media-fanned hysteria beats the drum for expanded war in the Middle East, heralding demands by U.S. politicians for military attacks on Iran, even though the threats alone violate international law.

- DISLOCATED KNEE He's baaaaack! That's right, former Austin Police Department Chief Stan Knee is back in action in the ATX, where he signed on as security director for the Seton Family of Hospitals, effective Sept. 20. Knee served as chief at the Austin Police Department from 1997 to 2006, a tenure that wasn't always marked by warm and fuzzy feelings; chief among the police union's complaints was that Knee's system of officer discipline was inconsistent at best. After leaving the APD, Knee went off to Afghanistan to serve as a mentor to the minister of interior. He returned to Austin in 2009, according to a Seton press release, to work as a "criminal justice consultant." – Jordan Smith
- > SBOE TAKES ON ISLAM Members of the State Board of Education step back into the culture wars Sept. 24 when they consider a resolution savaging social studies textbooks for being "tainted" with a "pro-Islamic/anti-Christian bias." The resolution will require textbook publishers to rewrite how they portray the history of Islam, but if the board adopts it, it will also be rewriting its own history. Texas Freedom Network Communications Director Dan Quinn noted that members' claims are based on a blatant misreading of old textbook editions no longer in classrooms. Plus, he said: "Some of them were on the board when they adopted those books. Do they honestly believe [they] adopted anti-Christian textbooks, and that even one school district in the state of Texas would buy such a book?" Much of the impetus behind the resolution comes from failed GOP primary candidates. Originally proposed by unsuccessful District 15 challenger Randy Rives, it is backed by the conservative Christian bloc of the board, including former Board President Don McLeroy (who lost his primary to the more moderate Thomas Ratliff). More than 100 religious leaders from Christian, Jewish, and Muslim faith groups called on the board to reject the resolution because, as Imam Islam Mossaad of the North Austin Muslim Community Center said, "Our children's textbooks must treat all religions accurately and fairly." - COAL CASUALTIES The No Coal Coalition, the Sierra Club, and Public Citizen reported this week that pollution from the proposed White Stallion coal plant in Bay City could lead to more than 600 deaths and 1,000 heart attacks just in Matagorda County. While supporters have noted that the plant could bring 200 permanent jobs to the area, No Coal Coalition President Allison Sliva asked in a statement, "Why should we trade the early deaths of 600 people for 200 jobs?" If permitted by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, the plant would be allowed to emit up to 4,956 tons of sulfur dioxide and 4,048 tons of nitrogen oxide annually, among other pollutants. Based on data about these toxins, the coalition concludes that the plant's public health costs could reach \$5.4 billion. For more, see www.texasgreenreport.com. - Nora Ankrum
- > ILLITERACY LINGERS Some 12% of Central Texans age 16 and older either have difficulty reading or cannot read at all, according to a new report from the Literacy Coalition of Central Texas. In fact, says the coalition, those Texans lack even the "minimum literacy skills necessary to fill out a job application." The report, "Literacy in Central Texas: A Snapshot of Conditions," links the problem to a host of other ills - including crime rates and reliance on public assistance – consequently costing the region \$20 billion annually in "lost wages, profits, and productivity." Data in the report shows that 85% of kids in the juvenile court system are "functionally non-literate" and that literacy training can lower rearrest rates for people on probation. The coalition also reports that limited literacy is the No. 1 "predictor of health outcomes" and can make everyday tasks - such as following the directions on a bottle of medicine - difficult. GO FOODIE AND MULTIPLY

Council sings happy trailers to you

Throw a stone – or better yet, a cupcake – anywhere in Austin, and you're likely to hit a **food trailer**. It ain't exactly news that the trailer food scene has exploded over the last few years, with vendors offering everything from donuts, tacos, and paninis to more exotic fare like pork-belly buns, bánh mì sandwiches, and lamb kebabs. Call it a sign of the recession, or of the lowered barriers to entry in the 21st century, but plenty of local foodies are setting up quickly and inexpensively to bring eats to the masses.

Today (Thursday) the issue comes to City Council, and no, they're not parking a taco truck on Second Street. (Well, maybe they are, but the Hustle hasn't checked on Twitter yet.) Instead, newly drafted regulations are coming before council. While nothing as onerous as the rules initially proposed in the spring, the changes will affect how trailers do business and the fees they pay to the city.

Three items are headed to council: Item 24 levies an annual \$125 fee on mobile vendors for **Fire Department inspection** of the use, handling, transportation, and storage of liquefied petroleum gas used to fire some establishments' grills and burners. Item 29 calls for an additional, annual \$125 application fee, estimated to bring in at least \$260,000, to be earmarked for three new **Health and Human Services** staffers to oversee the swelling trailer ranks: two sanitarians, or health inspectors, and a customer service position to process vendor applications.

Item 28 contains the broadest-reaching measures, six in all: the aforementioned Fire Department inspection; proof of Texas sales tax and use permit, which reputable vendors should have already; written proof that restrooms are available at the site, usually from an agreeable abutting business or portable toilets on-site using accredited waste haulers; mandatory itineraries for both truly mobile trucks and stationary trailers and booths (the latter simply stating they plan to stay put where they are); and two items related to the biggest hang-up from the last round of trailer regulations: central preparation facilities, more commonly known as commissaries. These require a notarized agreement between vendor and commissary, and also documentation of commissary usage in a vendor's monthly log.

The prior quandary in the spring dealt with the definition of a commissary. Snappy Snacks proprietor **Tom Ramsey**, who jump-started the current round of regulation a few years back after delivering several proposals to the city, took the term to mean both a kitchen and a place to prep and clean his vehicle, as his company operates truly mobile trucks; that requirement, however, had little bearing on those stationary trailers that don't have tires and chassis to clean, raising the possibility that commissary regulation could throw the trailer field into disarray (see "Trailer Snack Smackdown," May 13; and "Mobile Food," Food, Aug. 20).

However, it looks like the language has caught up. At the July 22 City Council Public Health and Human Services Committee meeting, the last stop for the proposed regs before they wound their way to the entire council, the committee had begun differentiating between unrestricted vendors (those allowed to cook food on-site) that are truly mobile, like Snappy Snacks, and unrestricted fixed vendors, which make up the bulk of the trailer scene. It's an

evolution from the previous, overly blunt distinction between unrestricted vendors and restricted vendors that only serve prepackaged food, like ice-cream trucks. So your favorite trailer shouldn't have any trouble meeting the commissary requirements; according to state code, a commissary for a fixed trailer can be any permitted restaurant kitchen. **Sue Simons**, supervisor of Austin/Travis County

Health and Human Services Department's Mobile Vendor Program says there are almost as many dif-

ferent setups as there are mobiles – estimated to hit 1,350 in October. "Their central commissary must be a permitted food enterprise," Simons said. "You cannot prepare food in a kitchen that is not licensed and inspected by the health department."

Ultimately, the proposals are far less intrusive than many in the mobile community feared earlier this year. Some questions still remain, e.g., how much advance notice is required in delivering the itineraries of truly mobile vendors. But, like the omnipresent eateries, new questions continue to pop up: HHSD punted on whether to require proof of product liability insurance for vendors (which some already carry), meaning that issue may return in the future. Likewise, the agenda backup states, "A growing issue is the formation of mobile food vendor courts on vacant land where no development approvals are required," going on to cite parking and permitting issues; the Code Compliance Department has recommended the city review rules for vendors on undeveloped tracts.

It's almost getting to be a question of space as the field's expanded; if keeping with a historic 20% annual increase in applications, Simons estimates there'll be some 1,620 mobile vendors in 2011 and 2,198 in 2012.

That's a lot of cupcakes. Get hot, fresh updates from Thursday's council meeting at austinchronicle.com/tdh.

Although the primary elections reflected a potential voting trend toward SBOE moderation, the current makeup of the board hasn't yet changed, and the loonies are just as likely as not to prevail on this issue as they have on other curriculum matters. It doesn't matter that the resolution condemns out-of-print books that haven't been used for years or that it employs a line-counting method of proving "bias" that is both inaccurate and preposterous, akin to arguing that the Ten Commandments are unimportant because they take up so little space in the Bible. Generating this kind of rancid nonsense is not about logic or accuracy; it's about maintaining reactionary pressure on the public schools, ignoring much more substantive issues like adequate resources and funding and preserving the delusion that only Christian warriors can hold the line against the onrushing Islamic hordes - you know, the Islamic hordes laying siege to Nacogdoches, right this minute, if only the lamestream liberal media would condescend to report it.

Where There's Smoke

It's often difficult to know whether the SBOE theatricals constitute farce or tragedy, but at the Forensic Science Commission, there's no doubt it's the latter. In a minimal attempt by the Legislature to inject some accurate, current science into Texas prosecutorial forensics - which bear no relation to the high-dollar magic acts featured on CSI the commission is currently mired in a prolonged struggle over the Willingham debate, a review of the "fire science" (or lack of it) at the heart of a conviction for a 1991 fire that eventually resulted in the 2004 execution of Cameron Todd Willingham for the arsonmurders of his three daughters.

Subsequent scientific review has strongly suggested not only that Willingham was innocent but that the fire itself was likely of accidental origin - and that the Corsicana fire investigators should have known enough to come to the same conclusion. D.A. Bradley has already accomplished his primary, if not express, purpose - to delay any commission conclusions about the investigation beyond the November election, since the undermining of an execution might cast a cloud on Gov. Perry's re-election campaign.

You might think that accurate forensic science is a sufficiently nonpartisan issue that everyone, most especially prosecutors, would want to get it right. In actual fact, crime in general and capital crimes in particular are so politicized in Texas that accuracy – and therefore justice – is persistently made subservient to convictions, and anything that might undermine that system is considered a threat.

Last week, wannabe attorney-general-inwaiting Bradley was visibly enraged that scientists on the commission rejected his staffdrafted report that would have exonerated the Willingham fire investigators without any serious review. Now he will have to preside over substantive discussion of the matter, perhaps even enduring testimony from forensic scientists who believe they can show that the Willingham investigation was clumsily botched. Bradley's not likely to change his mind - like Perry, he appears to believe that a conviction, however achieved, is synonymous with guilt - but perhaps a few more legislators, as well as citizens at large, will be persuaded that our criminal justice system and our institutional eagerness to execute often ride headlong and roughshod over constitutional protections and the due process of law.

As it happens, the October Texas Monthly features a lengthy and thorough recounting by Pamela Colloff of the Anthony Graves capital murder case – a Burleson County tale that features a sensationally heinous multiple murder, a long history of careless investigation and prosecutorial negligence and misconduct, as well as sloppy forensic science made to serve the prosecution's presumptive conclusions instead of accuracy and justice. As Chronicle readers who have followed Jordan Smith's years-long coverage of the case will know, Graves, on death row for nearly two decades, is almost certainly innocent and most certainly did not receive a fair trial. Although his conviction was finally overturned many years later, he is scheduled for retrial on the original charges next spring - and the prosecution appears determined to use, and the court to allow, the same tainted evidence against him.

Maybe someday, God willing, they'll teach this stuff in the Texas public schools.

AISD: Matching Buildings to Kids, or Vice Versa?

For the first time, **Austin Independent School District** is working on a **facilities master plan**, intended to take stock of both the buildings it has and those it needs, and then create a long-term vision of what to do with them. A series of public hearings will be held next week to give AISD residents the opportunity to provide insight on the proposals, but the board of trustees is already bracing itself for a potential backlash.

The need for long-range planning was originally proposed by the district's 2008 Citizens' Bond Advisory Committee and again in 2009 in MGT of America's districtwide efficiency study. (See "AISD 'Efficiency' Study: Not Exactly What the Doctor Ordered?," June 12, 2009.) On Feb. 22, the district hired Ohio-based educational facility planning firm **DeJong-Richter** to draw up a 10-year outline plan, restructuring the district's building inventory to fit with the five-year strategic plan adopted last December. Since April, the firm has been meeting with a 72-member advisory task force made up of teachers, administrators, parents, and community representatives. The current plan is to finalize the task force's recommendations on Oct. 19, for presentation to and approval by the board of trustees as early as November.

So far the task force's biggest job has been designing an educational framework establishing long-term needs and targets. Task force co-chair **Janet Mitchell** called it "our north star" that they will use to create "a facilities plan that provides educational adequacy for all students at all facilities



She described the group as being "in the options business," but the options offered could stretch from simple renovations and infrastructure investments to more radical shakeups, like redrawing attendance zones or repurposing, consolidating, or even closing schools. Because of the enormity of any potential changes, she said, "We want to really take our time and hear from the community what's important to them." When they have that feedback, Mitchell said, the task force will return to the community "with a specific set of potential options and get their vote, if you will. Then we'll know what recommendations will be feasible."

The community input may counterbalance the input from staff and consultants, who have already had their say. The headline figure for the district is that there are 99,900 permanent seats on AISD campuses serving 84,700 enrolled students. Beyond those are another 16,000 seats in the ubiquitous portable classrooms that provide relief on the most crowded campuses. MGT's study took note of "underutilized" schools like Allan Elementary which ran at 45% of permanent capacity in 2008-09 - and proposed a "conservative approach" of closing seven elementaries and one middle school. According to the study, that would reduce the district's excess capacity by 50% and save \$7.1 million a year. Board President Mark Williams acknowledged that closures are not off the table but described the discussion as still "hypothetical" - while adding that "to reduce spending, we may have to do some school consolidations and/or boundary adjustments in order to realign our facility resources with where the kids are."

On Sept. 7, district staff presented new figures to the task force reflecting that between 12 and 15 campuses are underutilized. However, for every Allan, there's an overcrowded campus like **Linder Elementary** (at 125% capacity), **Wooldridge Elementary** (127%), or **Mills Elementary** (135%). Additionally, "permanent capacity" doesn't tell the whole story; AISD also calculates "functional capacity," adding in portables but subtracting rooms dedicated to special education and districtwide administration. Under those calculations, Allan went from operating at 45% capacity to 47%. Portables can also disguise overstretched permanent facilities: In 2008 **Andrews Elementary** had only 594 permanent seats for 630 students, but throw in the portables and its 78% functional capacity makes it appear it has space to spare.

With so little clarity about what the numbers might actually mean in a particular case, any changes may well depend on whose ox (or neighborhood school) is selected to be gored. **Drew Scheberle**, the **Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce** vice president for education and work force development, said that any facilities decisions become "small-'p'



political." That is, "Are people showing up and banging on the table in greater numbers for, say, the McCallum performing arts center than Eastside structural improvements?"

While some areas of the district are expected to see shrinking student populations for the foreseeable future, both Northwest and South Austin are forecast to see extra pressures on classroom space. While the Sept. 7 presentation kept closures under discussion, staff also backed continuing plans for a South Austin high school, a North Central elementary, a Southeast early learning center, and an additional undesignated elementary. The funding for all of those was approved by voters in the 2004 and 2008 bond packages, but staff recommended an extra middle school and another elementary – putting the district in the seemingly contradictory position of closing some campuses while building others.

Not that the other big option – redrawing attendance zones – always goes smoothly. District 7 trustee **Robert Schneider** and his challenger **Warren Faulkner** agreed that old tensions over attendance zone realignments (see "Proposed Southwest School Boundaries Spark Concerns," Nov. 14, 2008) for Gorzycki Middle School and Baldwin Elementary survived into May's board elections. Williams called attendance zones "the holy war of school districts, in that it always raises everybody's temperatures." However, both he and Mitchell said they hoped the meetings will lower the heat. Mitchell said, "The most important thing we can do for our community is to walk through the thinking process of what the options are." – *Richard Whittaker*

Down and Out in Texas

This from the pages of "Tell us something we didn't already know": Poverty rates in the U.S. rose last year, with Texans suffering worse than most. According to the **U.S.** Census Bureau's annual report "Income, Poverty and Health Insurance in the United States," 14.3% of Americans were living at or below the federal poverty line in 2009, a worrying slump from 13.2% in 2008. The situation is even worse in the Lone Star State: Last year, an extra 428,000 Texans were classified as living below this threshold, pushing the total number of impoverished citizens to 4.3 million of the state's 24.6 million residents - or 17.3%, up from 15.9% in 2008. Only five states and the District of

Columbia have worse statistics (see table), but Texas gets a special dishonorable mention as the state with the lowest proportion of its population covered by health insurance - 73.9%, compared to the national average of 83.3%. Anne Dunkelberg, associate director for the Center for Public Policy Priorities, pointed out that Texas has historically had the nation's worst rates of insurance because so few employers offer coverage. "Nothing that has happened in the last 20 years has improved our standing any," said Dunkelberg, "so we've stayed at the end of the line." She said the first wave of health care reforms passed by President Barack Obama in March - including ending

Sanders Lawsuit: 'A Deal Is a Deal'

Did the city of Austin break a legally binding agreement to settle a civil rights suit over the police shooting death of Nathaniel Sanders II? And was the provision of that agreement requiring City Council approval of an offer to pay the family \$750,000 actually nothing more than a sham clause?

If you ask Adam Loewy, the attorney representing the Sanders family in the suit against the officer who shot Sanders in May 2009, the answer to both those questions is an unequivocal yes.

As such, Loewy last week filed a second lawsuit against the city and former Austin Police Officer Leonardo Quintana. arguing that when council members voted on July 29 to reject the settlement, they turned their backs on a binding settlement they had authorized that was negotiated during a 10-day mediation beginning in late June. "This sort of behavior by City leadership is shameful and despicable," Loewy wrote in

the breach of contract lawsuit filed in state civil district court Sept. 15. "They unquestionably authorized their lawyers to enter into a settlement agreement on their behalf ... and then - due to political pressure that had nothing to do with the actual lawsuit - breached the settlement. In Texas, however, a deal is a deal," the lawsuit continues. "The City of Austin had no valid legal justification for breaching the settlement agreement." Roughly a month after Quintana

shot Sanders in the parking lot of an East Austin apartment complex, Loewy filed in federal court a civil rights suit against the city and Quintana. According to Loewy, after the city was dismissed from the suit and only Quintana remained as a defendant (leaving the city only attached to the suit through its agreement to indemnify the officer), the city sought to settle the case. In fact, Assistant City Attorney Christopher Coppola "repeatedly told me that the city wanted it settled," Loewy said during a press conference last week. And when the two sides met at mediation, he said, Coppola set the tone by offering a "straight-up" apology to the Sanders family, telling them the city - represented by Coppola, city litigation chief Anne Morgan, and Assistant City Manager Michael McDonald, among others - was "there to settle."

When the Sanders family accepted the city's \$750,000 offer, the deal was done, said Loewy. In the days following the agreement, he says, he received four e-mails from city officials acknowledging that the deal was finalized, plus a voice mail from Robert Icenhauer-Ramirez, who was hired by the city to represent Quintana, acknowledging that a settlement had

been reached, and on July 13, he says. McDonald inked his name on the agreement "confirming that the City of Austin and Quintana agreed to settle." The next day, the federal court was notified, and the case was pulled from the jury docket.

But on July 29, says Loewy, City Council suddenly reversed course, voting 4-3 to reject the agreement, over the pointed disagreement of several council members, including Sheryl Cole, who said from the dais that she believed walking away from a settlement that the council had "instructed staff to go and negotiate" was a breach of the council direction to negotiate "in good faith." Piggybacking that logic, Loewy is now suing, asking that the court award the Sanders family the \$750,000 originally negotiated, along with Loewy's fees.

But Icenhauer-Ramirez says this latest lawsuit from Loewy is "completely absurd." He did indeed call Loewy after the settlement had been negotiated, in an attempt to be courte-

ous to a colleague now that the case was drawing to a close, but, legally, he says, it was meaningless. Moreover, he notes that neither he nor his client ever signed any settlement paperwork. Most importantly, he says, there's nothing legally binding about the negotiated settlement until the council votes to accept it; that contingency is part of the contract, meaning the city was well within its rights to reject the final offer, and Loewy has no legal leg to stand on. "An agent"

- that is, the city's lawyers - "cannot bind a city government," he says. Without council approval, he says, "it is not binding."

But Loewy contends that the caveat that council must approve any settlement is nothing more than a sham clause: He savs he was told repeatedly during mediation by city officials that "City Council approval was a 'rubber stamp' and a 'formality,' that they had a binding settlement agreement and that [the] case was 'over," Loewy wrote in his new lawsuit. That's ridiculous, says Icenhauer-Ramirez: "Can you imagine a lawyer saying, 'My client is just a rubber stamp'?"

In fact, city officials have argued that if anyone screwed the pooch on the settlement, it was actually Loewy, who, after the mediation was over, came out to say that the settlement was the city's way of acknowledging wrongdoing. That clearly ticked off the folks at City Hall - most settlements have a no-fault caveat attached. Loewy contends that he spoke before McDonald inked the final paperwork and thus his speech was in no way constrained; still, that doesn't mean it was the best decision he's made during the more than yearlong legal wrangling.

Key Events in Sanders Case

- May 11, 2009: Nathaniel Sanders II is fatally shot by APD Officer Leonardo Quintana; APD begins criminal and administrative investigations.
- June 2, 2009: Sanders' family files federal civil rights lawsuit against the city and Quintana.
- Aug. 5, 2009: Travis County grand jury declines to indict Quintana.
- Aug. 19. 2009: Citizen Review Panel asks for outside review of APD's internal investigation; two days later, city hires KeyPoint Government Solutions.
- Sept. 30, 2009: KeyPoint submits its findings to the city.
- Oct. 5, 2009: City releases heavily redacted version of KeyPoint report.
- May 6: Quintana is fired over a January charge of driving while intoxicated.
- May 7: An anonymous source provides the *Chronicle* with an unredacted copy of KeyPoint report, concluding that Quintana engaged in potentially criminal "reckless" behavior in relation to the Sanders shooting.
- May 19: City Attorney David Smith is forced into early retirement over handling of KeyPoint report.
- July 9: News is leaked of a proposed \$750,000 settlement between Sanders family and the city. Sanders family attorney Adam Loewy says, "The city and APD have finally taken responsibility for this unjustified shooting."
- July 29: Citing Loewy's remarks, City Council narrowly rejects settlement.
- Aug. 2: U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks sets a November 2011 trial date for the Sanders civil rights suit and, furious over the city's late cancellation of the settlement, orders all members of the council to be involved in further settlement discussions.
- Sept. 15: Sanders family files second lawsuit against the city and Quintana.

Indeed, it does seem that Loewy would have a tough time proving the council's final approval was irrelevant to the deal. But the process of getting to any conclusion might prove costly. Whether the city will be able to defend this case - now that plenty of folks in city legal are, essentially, fact witnesses in the case – or whether it will have to contract with outside counsel remains to be seen. On that note, whether Loewy, also now a fact witness in this latest suit, can remain the attorney on the case would also be in guestion.

For now, the city is holding its tongue: "Clearly, Mr. Loewy would like to try these issues through the media, which we are not going to do," city spokesman Doug Matthews said in a written statement. "In short, we do not believe the lawsuit has any merit. We'll take a look at the filing, consult with the Council and legal staff, and respond through the appropriate legal channels."

Meanwhile, the federal civil rights suit is still pending and has been placed on the jury docket for November 2011. – Jordan Smith

Waterboarded in South Austin

After a series of regulatory assaults on a small sober living residence in South Austin, the Slaughter Creek Acres Water Supply Corp. has agreed to give owner Polly Parsons three months to work on an exit strategy to sever her rocky relationship with the water supplier.

That decision was made as Parsons was still in crisis mode, desperately trying to locate a mystery leak on her property that she was told was losing 3,300 gallons of water a day. She said a water board member. Mike Dorsey, called her Sept. 16 to tell her of the leak and recommended she call his plumber, who found no leak. A second plumber also came up empty. Finally, a third plumber located and capped the leak, solving the problem.

On Sept. 17, the day after the leak alert, Parsons appeared before the water board to discuss a separate matter, this one involving adjacent property she owns as part of her Hickory Wind Ranch sober living program. The property includes both a residence and a small guest house where women in recovery live, paying what they can afford. The water board had threatened to terminate her water unless she ceased using the guest house, even though the tinv structure isn't equipped with a kitchen (see "Sober Living Dealt Splash of Cold Water," Sept. 17).

Parsons described last week's board meeting as "surreal," but board President Glenn Larkin offered a different account, summing

up the actions as just another routine business meeting. "We did grant [Parsons] the three months," Larkin said, referring to the time she was given to look for an alternative.

At this point, Parsons says her best option is to apply for her own well permit. Should that happen, Larkin said, the water supply board would have no further jurisdiction over Parsons' properties. Parsons isn't so sure. "We feel the chances are that these water board people are trying to financially stress us to the point of closing down." she wrote this week in an e-mail sent to supporters and other local operators of sober houses.

Parsons opened Hickory Wind a year ago as a tribute to her father, singer-songwriter legend Gram Parsons, who died of a drug

overdose in 1973. Parsons' tribute, while widely praised in Austin, particularly in the music community, has placed her squarely on the radar of local regulators, one of which in May cited the women's residence for a septic tank violation.

Three Austin lawyers were scheduled to meet with Parsons this week to provide pro bono assistance - not on the water matter, exactly, but on helping to craft and lobby for legislation that would protect sober living facilities from being targeted for minor violations. "We're looking at the bigger picture," said attorney Lee Ann Alexander. "We're trying to do something to help people with addiction issues." Getting language on the books whether at the local or state level - would be a good place to start. – Amy Smith

Commission Jerks Bradley's Chain

John Bradley's bid to put to bed the case of Cameron Todd Willingham was shot down Sept. 17 by his fellow members of the state's Forensic Science Commission, which has been considering whether junk science was used to convict Willingham of arson-murder in connection with the 1991 deaths of his three children in a house fire in Corsicana. Willingham protested his innocence until his death, by execution, in 2004. The question was first brought to the commission in 2006 by the New York-based Innocence Project. Last year, just before the commission was set to examine the findings of Maryland-based fire expert Craig Beyler, who cited problems with the science used to convict Willingham, Gov. Rick Perry intervened, replacing several members of the commission, including Austin defense attorney and commission Chair Samuel Bassett. Perry named Bradley, Williamson County district attorney, to head the commission.

Bradley's tenure on the panel has been controversial, at best. He broke the group into small committees (small enough to avoid a quorum and open meetings requirements) to investigate and review various complaints – including the Willingham matter. He also scrapped the planned live testimony by Beyler.

And under Bradley's direction, the group was set to consider closing the book on the

Willingham case last week. But after considering a draft report penned by Bradley – which concluded that the original investigators "did not commit professional negligence or misconduct" and that they had "applied the standard of practice, as best as it can be

reconstructed, for Texas fire investigators as that standard existed at the time of the investigation and trial" – the commissioners declined to approve the report, saying instead it would be better to keep the inquiry alive and to have the various fire experts come before the panel to answer specific questions about whether the science used in the Willingham case was solid.

Bradley didn't care for that idea, retorting that if the other members wanted to "waste another meeting" pursuing answers, they were free to do so. That's what they've opted to do, in part to pursue the question of whether the investigators in 1991 knew (or should have known) that the science used to conclude the fire was deliberately set was false. (In an Aug. 20 letter to the commission, Fire

Marshal **Paul Maldonado** wrote that he stood by his office's original conclusions in the case.)

That inquiry – which in a way pushes the commission work back to where it was going just before Bradley took over as chair – might help to answer several larger questions that remain. Indeed, in a letter to the

commission dated Sept. 13, state Sens. **Rodney Ellis**,

D-Houston, and **Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa**,

D-McAllen, noted that the investigation to that point had been "ignoring a critical part of the complaint," which is whether the fire marshal's office might have committed "professional negligence or misconduct if it failed to inform the courts,

prosecutors, the Board of Pardons and Parole, and the Governor that flawed arson science may have been used to convict hundreds or thousands" of

other defendants also charged with arson crimes. According to Ellis and Hinojosa, more than 700 people are currently serving time in Texas prisons for arson crimes. The commission is slated to question the

Keller Keeps Foot in Courtroom Door

Sharon Keller, the controversial presiding judge on the state's Court of Criminal Appeals, was back in court on Monday, arguing via her attorney (the affable Chip Babcock) that a three-judge panel should dismiss a public warning handed to her in July by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct. The warning came in connection with Keller's interference in a last-hour death case appeal in 2007, which ended in inmate Michael Richard's execution without his appeal having been heard. Infamously, when asked about keeping the court open late to accept the Richard appeal, Keller replied that the court closed at 5pm. Notably, the commission found that Keller violated the court's executionday procedures by handling the inquiry herself instead of referring all communications about the case to the assigned duty judge.

Prior to this week, the **Texas Supreme** Court had already rejected Keller's bid to void the SCJC's discipline; in response Babcock filed paperwork to begin a separate legal review in front of a three-judge panel (selected by the Texas Supreme Court), which would decide whether the public warning was justified. First up for the panel, the subject of Monday's arguments, was deciding whether to dismiss the charge altogether. According to Babcock, the SCJC overstepped its authority in issuing the warning, an option that was not available to the commission. Instead, Babcock argued, the SCJC was confined to issuing a censure, a recommendation to remove her from office, or a dismissal. Not so, says Mike McKetta, who represents the SCJC: There is nothing that prevents the commissioners from issuing a lesser form of punishment, which the public warning is. If the panel upholds the dismissal, the review process will continue during a three-day hearing beginning in late November. Ironically, we can't help but think that if Keller were facing herself in her own courtroom, she certainly would have shut the door on herself by now. - Jordan Smith

POCKETFUL OF COAL

Old King Coal – what a dirty old soul! Not dirty merely in terms of the gross pollution, mountain destruction, and mineworker deaths that the **Appalachian coal giants** are causing, but also in terms of the massive loads of **campaign cash** that they're shoveling into America's elections in a crass effort to get lawmakers who'll do their bidding in Congress.

In a letter to his corporate colleagues in the industry, a top executive of **International Coal Group** cited the recent **Supreme Court** decision allowing unlimited corporate

funds to be spent for or against candidates of their choosing. Let's do it, he said, calling on them to create a huge pool of industry money "to defeat anti-coal incumbents in select races, as well as to elect pro-coal candidates." In 2006, Maynard, a former judge, was caught vacationing on the French Riviera with Blankenship, even as his court was about to consider a \$50 million case against Massey Energy involving mineworker deaths. Later, no doubt refreshed by his jaunt to the Riviera with the coal baron, Maynard cast the deciding vote to overrule the \$50 million judgment against Massey.

Now that's the kind of "pro-coal" congressman the industry has in mind! Along with ICG, Massey Energy is behind the push to flood several November elections with industry money. It's a blatant attempt to install unabashed servants who will coddle Old King Coal's dirty soul.

GO FOR THE FEINGOLD

If you look at the whole flock of 535 Congresscritters, it's hard not to giggle – or break out in uncontrollable sobs at the thought that, oh my God, this is the **United States Congress**. As Peggy Lee sang years ago: "Is that all there is?"

Well, no – within the manure pile, there are quite a few genuine gems, and one of the finest is a fellow who consistently stands for common sense and the common good. He's **Russ Feingold**, U.S. senator from Wisconsin.


Slow Burn City's climate protection plan smolders in 2010

"I was hoping this would be the year we would really get going and show success, and the team would be all excited about it, and that didn't work."


Austin Climate Protection Program Director Ester Matthews was briefly summarizing the current state of the Austin Climate Protection Program and trying her best to be optimistic. But if anything, she was understating a very difficult year, during which the program mostly ran in place instead of moving forward, and indeed lost all six of its employees dedicated primarily to climate protection. There were various reasons for the departures, but Matthews says most left for better jobs at higher pay. (The staff of 11 also included Matthews, an administrative assistant, and three air quality employees - all doing double duty in ACPP in recent months.) In recent weeks Matthews has been interviewing job candidates - new hire Marc Coudert came on recently to tackle community outreach, and another person is expected to join the team next month - but it will be a challenge to fill all those positions before the end of the year, when Matthews herself is scheduled to retire. "So it's kind of sad," she continued, "but we're really a start-up. I got my budget in October of 2007, so we're barely 3 years old." A sense of the situation is reflected by the

protracted timing of ACPP's annual report to **2007 Travis County Footprint**





The "communitywide" greenhouse-gas emissions inventory includes municipal energy usage, plus estimates for county residents (chosen as a manageable boundary), including all energy and transportation uses. Not as precise as the municipal inventory, it is also based upon utility records (AE as well as Bluebonnet Electric Cooperative, Pedernales Electric, Luminant, etc.) and transportation estimates coming primarily from the Texas Department of Transportation.

The municipal inventory of CO_2 emissions – based on actual city usage as calculated from utility records (electricity, water, gas) – shows remarkable improvement over the last three years, largely due to departments moving to GreenChoice renewable sources, as well as the use of alternative fuels in city construction equipment. The arrow indicates the short-term goal of reducing greenhouse-gas emissions to 20% below the 2005 level. The 2009 municipal inventory of greenhousegas emissions (roughly 5.8 million metric tons) is based on direct data from utility records and municipal fuel use. It also includes the energy used to provide water to Austin residents, but *not* the energy used to provide electricity to residents or businesses by Austin Energy; that amount is reflected in the Travis County carbon footprint. The 2010 inventory will be available in 2011.

City Council, now tentatively scheduled for November, though it will reflect the program's progress primarily through 2009 (with quarterly updates through July of this year). Matthews had hoped this would be a breakout year for the program. Instead, she will mostly describe a period of consolidating previous gains, trying to spread the policy and culture of climate protection throughout city departments, and just beginning the communitywide outreach that was planned to be at full speed this year.

"We prepared through 2009, a lot of that was preparation," Matthews told me last week. "And 2010, we thought that would be our big year. We had the big kickoff in January to promote our carbon calculator, and it launched on Jan. 14, and we spent some money trying to attract people's attention to that product throughout the year. We also thought that our training program was going to be - our trainers had learned what they were going to do, and they were going to launch it, and it was going to be a much grander program. We were going to train all the city employees." Beyond that, the Carbon Footprint Calculator (www. cityofaustin.org/acpp/co2_footprint.htm), jumpstarted by ACPP training, would enable every Austin resident to calculate personal or family contributions to greenhouse-gas emissions, in order to know where to reduce.

A few thousand staff members and residents have indeed had the training, and people are increasingly visiting the calculator – just not in the numbers that Matthews had hoped by this time. (According to the July ACPP update, as of June 30 there were 891 registered users of the comprehensive calculator, much lower than expectations, although the one-minute version, at 543 per month, was doing much better than expected.) However, she does proudly point to institutional progress this year – most notably, getting 23 city departments and five building managers to develop and commit to departmental climate protection plans and to computerize the information necessary to make those plans work. She believes the departmental plans are "destined to be our best success this year," because people were assigned by departmental directors to work with ACPP on establishing specific goals, and then those directors and city managers signed off on the plans for future monitoring. "That information is being loaded into a computer program [Climate Action Reporting System] that all the department directors will be able to see."

As "How Cool Is Austin," p.27, reflects in more detail, there were other measurable accomplishments in 2009-10, across the five "plans" that make up the overall program. The most noteworthy:

• **Municipal Plan:** About 23% of city energy use now comes from renewable sources, primarily through Austin Energy's GreenChoice program.

• **Utility Plan:** Pending AE generation plan puts city on track to reach 30-35% renewable energy by 2020.

• Homes and Buildings Plan: The city adopted stricter efficiency building codes for new construction.

• **Community Plan:** Community outreach began; plans for summit in spring 2011 are in progress.

• **"Go Neutral" Plan:** The city introduced the Carbon Footprint Calculator.

These are not negligible accomplishments, but they haven't pushed Austin very far along on its declared goal of "carbon neutrality" by 2020. Matthews says the departmental plans established this year, if accomplished, would "I think we can do better, and it's a matter of setting goals that are more aggressive."

mean a 5% annual reduction in greenhouse-gas emissions, or 50% by 2020. If she had a "magic wand," she said, she would strengthen all the city's planning targets for greenhouse-gas reduction. "I think we can do better, and it's a matter of setting goals that are more aggressive."

In sum, however, Matthews acknowledges that 2010 has been a disappointing year for the city's ACPP progress, and she hopes it will receive renewed momentum with new staff and a new director, whoever that may be. The recent hiring of Chief Sustainability Officer Lucia Athens, under Assistant City Manager Sue Edwards, may have some bearing on the program's future, as environmental protection is one aspect of the city's sustainability goals. For now, the ACPP remains based in Austin Energy, and the program's budget has just been approved (as part of the overall city budget adoption) for fiscal year 2011.

Nevertheless, insists Matthews: "I'm still feeling good about this program. I was pleased to see how many departments really stepped up to the plate and tried to create aggressive goals. And there are people individually within departments that are trying to find opportunities for reductions. That's still happening."

How Cool Is Austin 2010 snapshot of the ACPP 'five plans'

Municipal Plan

Make all city of Austin facilities, fleets, operations carbon neutral by 2020.



Beginnings

"I think the piece is shit. Get down here." That was Jeffrey Nightbyrd on the phone. My Greyhound bus journey to and from New York City was to be an *Austin Sun* cover story. Dan Hubig created terrific illustrations. I'd worked a week on the piece. Hearing Jeff's "Hey" on the phone, I expected praise.

"I think the piece is shit. Get down here."

It was about 10 at night. My story had to be laid out and the paper delivered to the printer in the morning.

Nightbyrd could say something like "I think the piece is shit" clinically, with no whiff of personal conflict. There was a job to be done; it had not been done; it had to get done. It was a problem, a task – not a situation.

Jeff added, "Bring your typewriter."

The Sun's office was on the second floor of a house on 15th Street west of Guadalupe. There were too many people with too much to do in too small a space, and the mess was constant and ever worsening. If memory serves, there was no air conditioner – in the thick humidity of an Austin summer. (This was our Fourth of July issue, 1975.)

Jeff and I sat down with my typescript on a desk or on the floor or wherever there was space, and, indeed, the piece was shit: abstract rambling about the spirit of America.

The carrying case of my beloved Olympia portable was full of specific notes about all I'd seen and heard. I'd left my notes behind for what I thought were wonderful insights and rhapsodies, except that they were grounded in precisely nothing. What was needed was a couple thousand words of clear prose about real stuff.

By now it was past 11. My story had to be written, edited, typeset, proofed, corrected, and laid out by dawn.

We got it done. Learned a lot that night about my trade. Learned that writing for publication wasn't just about me. If the piece didn't come in "clean" (not requiring a rewrite), a crew of people whom readers are not aware of had to cancel dates, imbibe much coffee (or whatever), stay up all night, and, in general, have a hellish time, because I didn't do my job.

At least I didn't have to learn that twice. It has not happened since.

Learned also that in this gig you don't write for yourself. That's for novels and poems. You write to communicate something worth communicating to someone worth talking to. A piece about seeing America on a Greyhound requires detail. The reader must see and hear and feel the journey. An able writer works his ideas into that seeing, hearing, and feeling.

My problem was approach. A piece of writing can go drastically astray anywhere along the way, but especially dangerous are the beginning and the end. I'd begun that piece deep inside my head and never got out of it.

With the South Austin Popular Culture Center (**www.samopc.org**) hanging an *Austin Sun* exhibit until Oct. 23, many memories ricochet within me, but what I remember most aren't incidents or personalities. My most vivid memories are of writing.

Theatre reviews, movie reviews, "think" pieces (as they were called) - the problem always was how to begin. Every time was a first time. I didn't want to sound like anyone else and didn't want to begin like anyone else, but I had to do that so anyone else might be interested. My first three paragraphs usually took me days. No kidding. Two or three or four eight- or 10- or 12-hour days, writing, rewriting, and re-rewriting those first three paragraphs while cursing, ranting, crumpling many sheets of paper, giving up, refusing to give up, thinking I had it, seeing I didn't, trying again.

Once I had those three paragraphs, get the rest came in a few hours.

3am

I did not understand and could not admit that I was terrified. Not of failure. Of exposure. Determined that my writing be as genuine as

possible, and just as afraid of exposing my innards, my commitment and my fear crashed into each other every time and made me a oneman demolition derby.

The intelligent, beautiful, generous woman with whom I lived – she who paid most of the bills, including those of the dentist who fixed my bad teeth – took more shit from me than anyone

merits from anyone. I probably never said thank you. I wasn't the "thank you" type in those days. My moods, my games, my temper, my utter stupidity about what a "relationship" was or required – well, there's nothing more tiresome, more clichéd, and more of a pain in the ass than a young writer acting out his or her pride and fear, needy as a 5-year-old and resenting even the meeting of those needs. (I stayed young that way for a shamefully long time.)

Years later, when, as jazz musicians say, I'd "made my bones," I was asked about my sense of form, and there it was, on the tip of my tongue, as though it hadn't taken years to develop and as though others hadn't paid heavy prices for my excesses: "Begin in the middle. Have the following paragraphs work out from that hub like spokes on a wheel.



Finish at what could be a beginning, so the piece ends with energy."

At other times, I answered: "It's like baseball. You're not gonna hit it out of the park every time. But you gotta get on base. Some pieces are stand-up doubles, sometimes you're sliding headlong into first, but you put the ball in play and you get on."

Or another baseball metaphor: "Raymond Chandler said when you're a pitcher and you can't throw the high hard one, you throw your heart. You throw something. You don't walk off the mound and weep. He didn't say that there are days when a pitcher has all his stuff and days when he doesn't, but a good pitcher knows what he's going in with. You don't write about a big subject when you don't have your best stuff. How do you know? Your failures teach you. And sometimes - like when Dock Ellis pitched that no-hitter for the Pittsburgh Pirates blasted on LSD – you're way out there and you don't even know who you are, but the words come and you follow 'em."

Or the jazz metaphor: "You play sax or piano. You've got a gig in a cellar joint somewhere. You know your way around your axe" – "axe" is jazz slang for "instrument" – "and you know the tune and chords, and you feel into it and just play. A good jazz musician can play anything he hears in his head. But that takes lots of practice and many bad nights." Since the *Sun*, I've written maybe a thousand pieces. (When I see it that way, I think, "Does this guy ever shut up?") Every one of those pieces depended on an editor, proofreaders, fact-checkers, business people, salespeople, layout people, graphic artists, accountants, and receptionists. (Yes, receptionists. Much of the *Sun*'s chaos, early on, was because it was no one's job to answer the phone. Lord knows how many ads we lost because we didn't realize that a receptionist is important.)

OK, here's a *Sun* story never before told or even whispered:


Sometimes we'd begin a piece on, say, page 16, and "jump," or continue, it back on page 8 because there'd been no overall plan. And often our typos in print were atrocious. I composed a letter to the editor detailing several egregious mistakes. My friend wrote it out in her precise cursive, on good stationery, and signed it with a name like "Elizabeth May Whetfield." Nightbyrd read us the letter at an editorial meeting and was most stern about how we had to get our act together. I never let on. Just asked if we'd print the letter. A chorus of: "No!" It was too much on the mark. Someone I'll not name said: "Elizabeth May Whetfield – I've heard of her. She's a somebody in this town." Two or three others murmured how, yeah, they, too, had heard of Elizabeth May. She was a somebody in this town.






SHAKESPEARE AROUND AUSTIN

Shakin' up how we see Will

To paraphrase the Bard himself: "What a piece of work is Will! how noble in reason! how infinite in variations!" By which I mean there seems to be no limit to the variety of ways in which Shakespeare's plays are presented. They get set in every era of human history (including a few yet to come), done with large casts and small, in everything from the fussiest period regalia to the most mundane modern streetwear. And this fall's crop of local Shakespeareana offers Austinites a crash course in the range of approaches to Will's works.


This week, for instance, sees dueling *Dreams – A Midsummer Night's Dream* for those of you who slept through sophomore English – that represent opposite ends of the spectrum in staging that play. On the modern and minimalist side are Actors From the London Stage, making their annual autumnal visit to the University of Texas to give us a taste of how Shakespeare's countrymen do it. For three nights on the stage of the McCullough Theatre (and one night in the Theater Barn of the Winedale Historical Center), this troupe of trained

British thespians will conjure all of the comedy's feuding fairies, confused lovers, and rude mechanicals, not to mention the Athenian wood they wander in, with just five actors and a smattering of props and costume pieces. It's a feat of theatrical magic and one that, based on similar productions that AFTLS has brought to Austin, deserves to be seen.

Meanwhile, across the city and under the stars is a production by the Baron's Men that hews to the traditional and spectacular side. At the Curtain Theatre, that scaled-down replica of an Elizabethan playhouse built

by gaming magnate Richard Garriott on his Lake Austin estate, these enthusiasts of 16th century drama will use historical staging practices to create something of the feel of a production in Shakespeare's day. Opulent Elizabethan costumes and masks, plus period music and dancing, will give this Athens the air of an English court. It's a rare opportunity – in Austin, anyway – to experience the *Dream* with this kind of bygone spectacle.

Still rarer is the opportunity to experience Shakespeare's work in the modern reconstruction of his theatrical home. Most of the time, that requires us to jet across the Atlantic, but for one night this fall, the Globe Theatre will be in Austin – on screen, at least. Spinning off the recent success of filmed opera productions in cinemas, Opus Arte, a production arm of the Royal Opera House, filmed three of the Globe's 2009 productions and made them available for international



distribution. The Long Center has snapped up one of them for our viewing pleasure, the early comedy *Love's Labour's Lost*, which *The Times* of London hailed as "entirely enchanting." Having finally seen for myself last year just how clear, vibrant, and entertaining the Globe can make Shakespeare, I'm thrilled at the prospect of being able to enjoy another staging of theirs, and without having to cross the Big Pond. Filmed stage productions get a bad rap for being flat and uninvolving, but I'm betting that the high spirits and immediacy that make a Globe performance so infectious translate to the big screen intact.

culture Typically, it takes two productions of the same play to provide us with different perspectives on the work, but in his flash new production of Shakespeare's signature play, Hamlet, Justin Scalise will manage the neat trick of doing it with the same show. How he'll accomplish that is with two runs of the play in dramatically different settings. The first, which opened last week, is in the Scottish Rite Theatre, the oldest of Austin's playhouses with a traditional proscenium arch and sumptuously painted flats from the era of Sarah Bernhardt - in short, a venue in which the traveling players to the Danish court would feel right at home. But in another month, he'll revive the production in the Boggy Creek Masonic Cemetery, where it will be performed by torchlight. In the chill night air and a setting so redolent of mortality, the play's musings on being and not being will no doubt take on a heightened meaning.

Engagement UT's new Visual Arts Center connects its

art department with the world

Natural light was not something one saw nuch of inside the University of Texas Art Building for most of its 47-year history. As with a number of campus buildings of the day, he design favored monumental walls of brick unbroken by any kind of architectural ornanent, including glass, which left it little more han a clump of massive, featureless blocks. Passing through the Art Building's doors was antamount to entering a tomb where the ight of day could not penetrate and the living world was nowhere to be seen.

So after decades of navigating that facilty almost exclusively by the artificial glow of luorescent tubes, visitors will find that what's mmediately striking about the building's new Visual Arts Center - built from the bones of he old University Art Museum/Huntington Gallery/first Blanton Museum space - is the natural light flooding it. No matter where you urn in its five new galleries, you're either facng a window to the world or the outside light streaming through one. Architects Lake | Flato have worked some of the same magic that they lid with another old bunker across campus, he Harry Ransom Center. They broke through he dense, forbidding exterior and let the sunshine in. It not only warms up the space for hose inside the structure and allows them a connection to the outside world; it gives those out in that world a way into the building, a glimpse of its interior that invites them in.

Bathed in the light spilling through the new windows of his renovated office on the Art Building's east side, Department of Art & Art History Chair John Yancey notes how those 'ew panes of glass mark a profound shift in accessibility for the department. "The whole building was very much an opaque kind of cube, so the things that punch out on this side of campus are *huge* for us – for our students and for other students, because like 30,000 students get off the buses [in front of our building] every day. And normally, they get off


the buses and head west, don't even cast an eye over here. Now, they're lookin': 'What's that? What's going on?'"

Students and anyone else coming in to discover what's going on inside the Art Building will find in the Visual Arts Center a space at once unfamiliar and familiar, new and old. The two-story layout is much the same as it was, although more floor space has been created upstairs by filling in some open air on the galleries' east end, and the massive spiral staircases that anchored the northwest and southeast corners of the old galleries are gone. Most significantly, the space has been divided into five galleries, each with its own identity.

• The Vaulted Gallery (1,875 square feet), accessed directly from the center's west entrance, is a grand open space that soars a full two stories up to the newly uncovered barrel vaults that have been concealed for decades by a false ceiling. The artists exhibiting here will be early in or in the middle of their careers and will be invited to create sitespecific installations that can be developed with the assistance of students. VAC Director Jade Walker says that two or three projects will be generated a year, with the artists in residence in the department for three to five weeks prior to the exhibition opening. "When I was looking at a lot of the artists, we talked about making the biggest piece they've ever made," she says.

• The Arcade (2,086 square feet), east of the Vaulted Gallery downstairs, is a flexible gallery distinguished by large video projectors which are positioned in front of a large window that looks toward Darrell K. Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium so that projected images may be seen by people outside the building as well as inside. "I keep thinking about [the Arcade] as a living-room space or a space for real accessibility for partnerships and collaborations," says Walker, "and it falls in the middle of the building, so that kind of makes sense."





situated mostly above the Arcade, is devoted to traveling exhibitions and works created by faculty, students, and alumni. Exhibitions are curated by the director or a visiting curator.

• The East Gallery (1,322 square $\bar{f}eet$), which sits above the Center Space for students, is intended for department faculty, with exhibitions that feature work by the instructors themselves, that they have curated, or that relates to classroom study.

The fact that these venues have such specific functions addressed to specific constituencies is no accident. The department has been looking for ways to more effectively engage its students and faculty members, and giving them spaces dedicated to their efforts is a significant way of doing that. "You have to have an opportunity to interact, exchange, collaborate with other people in the program, with the world outside [the classroom]," says Yancey. "Otherwise, it becomes kind of an archaic experience, frankly, and students don't want archaic experiences. They want something that actually is going to connect to the world and where they feel it connecting to the world as they're doing it. Not something that, 'When I'm finished with my B.F.A., then I'll discover the world.' They want very much for the experience to be part of the world all the way through."

The department chair characterizes the current students as "hungry" for contact with working artists and opportunities to exhibit their own work. The VAC is "a huge game-changer for us, because it allows students to be able to not only participate and envision but to actually do things. Getting art students to want to join anything has been historically almost impossible. The nonconformist trend is so great that, if it's not a small band, the idea of joining things doesn't quite gibe. And to see students now that really want to work together, really want to collaborate. The enthusiasm of putting up that first show in the Center Space gallery was so evident."

Walker, too, has seen a sea-change in the department already: in the students who crowded around artist-in-residence David Ellis and peppered him with questions as he worked on the "motion painting" he was commissioned to make for the Landmarks program, by the 10-15 students a day who have come to the Vaulted Gallery to assist current artist-in-residence Ry Rocklen in building the sculptures for his installation "ZZZ's," and even by the conversations she's had since the Art Building renovation was complete. Prior to directing the VAC, Walker ran the Creative Research Laboratory, an exhibition space for department students and faculty that was located off-campus in Flatbed World Headquarters. As valuable as the space was, its distance meant it wasn't on everyone's radar. "There wasn't as much engagement," says Walker. "Here, there are students that are knocking on the doors in the afternoon, and I'm having way more discussions than when I was off-campus at the CRL."

The East Gallery

Yancey credits the opening up of the space as a catalyst for the change. "When people have sunlight and they can see a courtyard and they actually feel like standing there talking to each other, those aren't really tangible things, but they have this intangible effect that kind of compounds and can become contagious in ways. You see it on people's faces, and you see it in body language, and all that is hard to predict, but it's really gratifying when you see it happening. I can walk out here, and it's completely different than when I walked down that same hallway three years ago. It feels different, and people look different when they walk down it."

Yancey speaks of new conversations not just inside the department but with the university, the city of Austin, and the world beyond it. "One of the things that has rippled through and affected our department," he says, "is an idea of: Where are we in the world? Where are we, not just in Austin or in Texas or the United States, but where are we in the world? When you start to think in that way and your view starts to change in that way, expectations change. There's a transformation that has occurred here over the last nine or 10 years and is culminating at this moment. This is a pivotal historical moment."

THE ARTS STYLE

after a fashion by stephen MacMillan Moser

IS PEOPLE! When I moved back to Texas for the third time in 1973. I went to see Sovlent Green with a friend of my sister's. I remember it well primarily because I remember we could smoke cigarettes in the theatre and bring in our own bottles of Dr **Pepper** (or **DP**, as we called it then), so I'd watch just about anything. I loathe science fiction, particularly the intergalactic variety (in space no one can hear you yawn), and though Soylent Green was indeed science fiction, it was a catchy unintergalactic premise. Made in 1973, this movie takes place 49 years in the future - in 2022, a scant 12 years from now. The story is that society has completely broken down by 2022 and we have completely destroyed our world through pollution and overpopulation. The differences between the remaining moneyed class and the multitudes of have-nots is as pronounced as ever, and rioting over food (or the lack of it) is not uncommon. Food as we know it is a thing of the past for everyone except for the privileged few. Meat is a rarity for everyone, and many citizens of 2022 have never seen an egg, Strawberry jam is \$150 a jar (Big deal! You can already pay \$11.99 for a pound of chicken salad at Whole Foods!), and everyone eats margarine, which is perhaps the most disturbing element of the movie's premise. Chariton Heston (commonly mistaken for **Jesus**) plays Detective Thorn – an overzealous policeman on the trail of a murderer, Tab Fielding (played by porn pioneer **Chuck Connors**). Any movie starring Heston (according to IMDb.com, aka "Captured Slave Charlton Heston," aka "Charlton

Easton") is instantly dated. But this movie hardly needed Heston to be dated; it does it all by itself. It's always funny to me how movies - whether they're portraying the past or the future - usually wind up looking exactly like the decade in which they were made. And this one's a real lulu. Apparently in 1973, the film's visionaries thought that everything would look pretty much the same in 49 years. Trimline phones (with cords!) would still be the rage, and emergency phone calls would have to be made from emergency phone boxes on the street. This movie missed the cellular revolution entirely. On the other hand, women are "furniture" that come with luxury apartments, and female lead **Leigh Taylor-Young** (as Shirl) is among them. Living in luxury as concubines has a heavy price, and on their rare days off, the "girls" all get together like a harem of early Seventies odalisques, looking like candy-colored prostitutes - er, "models" wearing fake Halston and enough lip gloss to lubricate the Statue of Liberty. It's interesting to hear them discuss global warming and the greenhouse effect as a 79-year-old Edward G. Robinson (who, at times, bears an uncanny resemblance to Chronicle Editor Louis Black) pedals a stationary bike to produce enough electricity to work by. Fortunately, there's Soylent Green (or Soylent Gold or Soylent Red or even Soylent Teal, as Phil Hartman once lampooned on Saturday Night Live). But unfortunately, supplies of this ultranutritious substance, which is supposedly made from plankton, run low, and the crowd riots. One man

starts yelling: "The scoops are coming! The scoops are coming!" And in no time, the scoops (aka garbage trucks) arrive and start dumping the unruly crowd into their hoppers. I just love that idea. (Picture a Critical Mass demonstration.) During the manhunt, the fatherly Sol (Robinson) provides sentimental nuances and glimpses of the world that he remembers. OK, in 2022, he's about 80, which would make him 68 in 2010. Clearly the world he's remembering is the world we live in now (minus Trimline phones). I love the very humane death chamber where Sol goes to die. Thousands of people choose death, and death clinics that look like airport terminals are available to assist them. A few simple questions - "What's your favorite color?" and "What kind of music do you like?" - and voilà! - you are led to a sterile lablike setting and met by staff dressed in white robes (Thetans?) who rub you and speak to you soothingly while you drink a lovely sedative that kills you. But before you die, you are surrounded by screens showing the wonders of nature scenes of deer and flowers and ocean sunsets. Meanwhile. Thorn kills Fielding and shows up at Sol's end. He surreptitiously follows Sol's body as it is loaded into a garbage truck to be taken to the waste processing plant. We won't spoil the film for you (if you haven't already seen it 1,000 times on cable), but we'll leave you with this: Despite its bleak ending, I always remembered this piece of dialogue. When Thorn reminds Sol that he always says people used to be nicer, Sol responds: "No, people have always been rotten. But the world was beautiful then.'

As He Lay Dying From deathbed to spiritual rebirth in the Pulitzer Prize-winning 'Tinkers'

The inner workings of clocks. The foliage of New England farmland, season to season. The terrorizing buildup to an epileptic fit. Debut novelist Paul Harding is an obsessive cataloguer. You could probably spell out *Tinkers*' slim plot in a sentence or two – a clockmaker named George Crosby, on his deathbed, remembers his father, Howard, a salesman with the heart of a poet. But the dramatic heft of the novel, which nabbed an under-the-radar win for this year's Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, is in the breath-catching power of Harding's prose. It's a short book, squat in design and running only 196 pages, but those 196 pages are something to savor.

The Chronicle recently traded e-mails with Harding in advance of his Austin appearance on Sept. 30, as part of the Michener Center for Writers Reading Series.

Austin Chronicle: The book mostly alternates between the perspective of George on his deathbed and Howard as a tinker. There's a very stark contrast between George's present-day existence, confined to a single room, and Howard's roaming in the natural world. Was one easier than the other to tackle?

Paul Harding: The experience of writing the characters - their settings, their voices - was complementary. Whenever one started to feel claustrophobic or too far-ranging, I switched to the other. Hopefully, the two combined gives a satisfying whole. Circumstances sort

of force each man into relative extremes, especially George, but I have the ability to wander around in the woods for entire days on end as well as to lie on the couch reading and napping and riding the updrafts of consciousness.

AC: The three generations of Crosby men could all be seen as failed storytellers: the preacher whose sermons grow increasingly unintelligible; the unpublished poet; and the wouldbe memoirist who burns the tape after the shock of hearing his voice. Is this a glimpse at the frustrations

of writing - knowing the poetry, or possibility of it, is there, but being stymied in the attempt to put it on the page?

PH: Generally, yes, the phenomenon of being frustrated in getting what's in your mind into language, onto the page is certainly baked into the book. But I never thought about the subject deliberately. Or, maybe I did think about it deliberately, but not thematically, or in such particular, meta-fictional terms. I'm concerned with the larger experience of the discrepancies between what we know and how we feel, what we desire and what we have etc.

AC: And while we're on the subject of writing: Clock repair is a running theme in the book. It's methodical, precise, ordered - sort of the antith-






PH: Hmm. Neither, really. It's still pretty mysterious to me at this point, deep into it as I am. It takes place after the events in Tinkers, but it's not a sequel, per se. The protagonist, Charlie, one of George's grandsons, certainly bears a family resemblance to his forebears, and they are part of his well of experience, and, I suppose, the book continues to mine my own aesthetic and thematic preoccupations. So, maybe an evolution rather than a reaction or continuation.



Spartan Pizza

Nestled under the shade trees right outside the **Red Shed Tavern**, not that far north of Slaughter Lane, sits the gleaming 1955 Spartan Imperial Mansion travel trailer that has been retrofitted to become Spartan Pizza. Owners **Kelly Kerbow Hudson** and **Jeremy** and **Nicole Portwood** have joined forces to create exquisite NY-style pies in their rebuilt vintage double-decker Blodgett pizza oven. Named for characters in Greek mythology (a natural, given the Spartan trailer as home base), the pizzas and paninis are made using fresh dough and the best ingredients. What is obvious to us is that great thought went into the combinations; all components are very complementary. The other thing you'll discover when you taste Spartan's pies is that the toppings are distributed with care so that every bite presents a different taste profile.

We sampled the **Zeus** (all named pizzas are \$8.50/10-inch and \$13.50/14-inch), which is topped with roasted garlic olive oil, very high-quality bacon, fresh spinach, slices of plum tomato, slices of fresh mozzarella, and grated mozzarella. Simply put, this is a spectacularly delicious pizza, worthy of the Greek god for whom it is named. The ratio of toppings-to-dough is perfect, while the crust is chewy and light and nicely browned from the stones. The **Hades** is just as good, topped with tomato sauce, excellent chunk Italian sausage, tart green

olives, puddles of melted herbed ricotta, and a generous sprinkling of red pepper flakes. Again, a magnificent pizza pie with ideal balance and flavor. You can also build your own pie (\$7.50/11.50), which gets you one topping and a choice between tomato sauce or the garlic olive oil; there's a huge list of additional toppings at \$1-2 each.

We tried a panini as well, settling on the **Athena** (all paninis are \$6.50). Loaded with roasted mushroom slices, spinach, artichokes, Parmesan, and roasted garlic olive oil, it is a vegetarian's dream. Dine on the picnic tables or inside Red Shed, or take it to-go. This is fantastic pizza, not to be missed. – *Mick Vann*



WILL BOX WINES TAKE OVER THE WORLD? It's been just over three years

since we did one of our first major tastings of box wines ("Sipping From the Spigot," Aug. 10, 2007), and the quality just keeps getting better and better. One of the better brands, **Bota Box**, whose wines all run about \$18 per box,

makes a couple of wines that are so good you could usually fool folks into thinking they are drinking wine that costs more than \$10 a bottle instead of a \$4.50 equivalent. The **Pinot Grigio** is a perfect example. It's a California wine, so it won't taste as good as the gold standard from northeastern Italy, but nor will it taste as watery as the majority of other Italian versions. The **Old Vine Zinfandel** is an even bigger surprise.

Delicato Family Vineyards, Bota's owners, also makes **Gnarly Head Old Vine Zin**, and the taste similarity is amazing given the price disparity.

Pepperwood Grove's Big Green Box is a

play on its eco-friendly container. (It should be pointed out that most all box wines are more eco-friendly than bottled wines, if only for reducing the weight for transport and avoiding the glass-making process). Pepperwood Grove's \$7-a-bottle wines have always tasted like \$10-12 wines, but the box wines do too, and they run \$18 for the equivalent of four bottles. The **California Chardon**nay and **Chilean Cabernet Sauvignon** both possess that rarest of attributes in an inexpensive wine: palate-cleansing acidity.

The Bota Box wines are all over town now, and the Pepperwood Grove wines will be shortly. For anyone who relishes a nice wine at an unbeatable price, these are well worth trying. If you usually drink wines in the \$10-15 range, these wines will come as a pleasant surprise. And, of course, the original reason for box wines is that they show no degradation after a month of being open. Try that with a bottle! – Wes Marshall

The seductive aroma of smoking meat wafting over Downtown last Sunday came from Texas Monthly's first Texas BBQ Festival. The magazine published its most recent list of Texas' Top 50 barbecue eateries in June 2008 and invited all 50 of those businesses to participate in an Austin-style Sunday afternoon of barbecue and live music. Nineteen pit masters answered the call and rolled into Austin ready to strut their stuff. The smoking started Saturday night in the Run-Tex parking lot, where those who had traveled the longest distances were allowed to set up in order to be ready to serve by noon on Sunday. When the party started, barbecue tents circled the scenic City Terrace of the Long Center, with pits smoking away on the lawn and driveway. It was a Texas barbecue lover's dream come true: At the incredibly reasonable price of \$15 per person, the festival attracted a sold-out crowd of nearly 1,000 people over the course of the afternoon. Even occasional rain showers did not dampen their ardor. Barbecue lovers visited the booths, sampling signature preparations and texting their votes in the People's Choice Awards. The crowd enjoyed cold Shiners, cocktails, and live music at long communal tables under the seating tents; shopped for T-shirts in the marketplace; and learned to make classic barbecue sides from cookbook author Paula Disbrowe and desserts from Pastry Queen Rebecca Rather at the cooking demo stage. It was no surprise that Snow's BBQ had the longest lines of the afternoon, considering Texas Monthly anointed the Saturday-only joint in tiny Lexington as the best in the state two years ago. Owner Kerry Bexley and pit mistress Tootsie Tomanetz served up their mouthwatering brisket as fast as they could slice it all afternoon. The crowd ranged in age from toddlers gnawing on rib bones to the venerable dean of Central Texas pit masters, 86-year-old Vencil Mares of Taylor Cafe. Second and third generations of legendary barbecue families from Lockhart (the Schmidts of Kreuz Market, Nina Sells and John Fullilove of Smitty's Market), Taylor (Wayne Mueller of Louie Mueller Barbecue), and Llano (the Wootens of Cooper's) were on hand upholding their treasured family traditions. Austin was ably represented by the brisket, sausage, and pulled pork from Lamberts. When the smoke cleared, the People's Choice Awards were announced. Brisket: a tie between Snow's and Buzzie's Bar-B-Q of Kerrville. Pork ribs: Stanley's Famous Pit Bar-B-Q in Tyler. Beef ribs and sausage: Cousin's Barbecue of Fort Worth. Congratulations to all the winners and a big shout-out to all the talented folks who shared their art and craft with us this weekend. This festival was a winner from start to finish. TM has vet to announce whether the festival will become an annual event, but with the quality and diversity of Texas barbecue available, the possibilities are endless. Kudos for a job well done! Mexican food is always a hot topic in Austin, but this year, it's particularly appropriate to pay attention and appreciate the fare – 2010 is the bicentennial commemoration of Mexico's independence from Spain, as well as the 100th anniversary of the Mexican Revolution. We're fortunate that our city contains all manner of eateries representing a spectrum of Mexican foods, from Tex-Mex to Mexico City-style, from hole-in-the-wall taquerias to whitetablecloth fine dining.

A recent addition to the scene is El Mesón Cocina Mexicana y Tequilería, which quietly opened on South Lamar in May. This is a new venue for chef Marisela Godinez, a Mexico City native whose cooking has long delighted a small but hardcore band of aficionados at El Mesón Taquería on Burleson

Road in far Southeast Austin. (It's been awarded six *Chronicle* Restaurant Poll Critics Picks.)

It's a very fine thing that Godinez now has a centrally located restaurant to showcase her enormous talent and deep understanding of regional Mexican cooking. Tex-Mex this is not; diners who expect bottomless baskets of chips and our beloved cheesy enchiladas might be disappointed. But then, they could find themselves pleasantly surprised by fiery yet subtly complex salsas, handmade corn tortillas, and interesting *antojitos* like quesadillas de *huitla*-

I have been a fan of Bess Bistro's unfussy yet upscale cuisine since it first opened in 2006. Through the years there have been a few chef changes, and while each chef has added signature dishes and tweaked the menu, the eclectic take on classic comfort foods has remained. After this spring's departure of chef Mizael Saucedo (now at Urban at the Westin), chef Camden Stuerzenberger of Walton's Fancy and Staple took over at Bess, juggling both jobs and keeping the menus significantly different while relying on talent from both kitchens. We visited Bess recently to check out the new menu, which we found very much to our liking.

We were happy to see the place hopping with customers engaged in lively conversation on a warm Friday evening, much like when the bistro first opened and the buzz about its famous owner had reached a frenzy. Too hungry to wait 45 minutes for a table, we cozied up to the bar, where we were greeted with a smile and prompt service. We started with a generous bowl of crispy, fried, semolina-crusted artichoke hearts and thin lemon wheels tossed *coche* (\$8.29) and habanero-kissed shreddedbeef *salpicón*, Yucatecan-style (\$5.29).

Do yourself a favor and start with made-toorder Monterrey-style guacamole (\$5.29). A big bowl arrives full of chopped avocado, tomato, onion, and jalapeños balanced with salt, lime, and cilantro and accompanied by a plateful of perfect *totopos* – corn tortilla wedges so crunchy and greaseless it's as if no oil was involved.

Another impressive dish from the deep-fryer is *tostados de pescado* (\$7.50), smoking hot cornmeal-battered tilapia filets on crispy corn tortillas with rainbow coleslaw and

piquant chipotle aioli. Billed as an appetizer, it's enough for a meal.

RESTAURANT The *moles* of Mexico are vast and varied; we in the U.S. tend to forget there are many more than the ubiquitous brown *mole* poblano. Godinez does a nice job with two others; if you're a *mole* fan (or want to become one), try the chicken in Hidalgo-style red *mole* or the unusual *mole verde* (\$8.79) made from toasted, ground pumpkin and sesame seeds, serrano chiles, tomatillos, and fresh greens.

The most expensive menu item (\$12.95) is an astonishing chile relleno unlike any I've had before. A dried red ancho pepper is stuffed with Monterrey, Cotija, and goat cheeses; pine nuts; and dried cherries. It isn't battered and fried, and it's dressed in tomatillo cream sauce. It's a deftly coordinated dance of flavors and textures – simultaneously spicy, sweet, tart, crunchy, chewy, and creamy.



Desserts vary daily; I've enjoyed a classic flan (\$4) and a lovely dense cheesecake topped with burnt caramel sauce (\$5). I was less entranced by the *natilla* (\$4), a rather bland vanilla pudding, but I loved the accompanying Mexican wedding cookie. And the bar offers 40-plus tequilas served as shots, margaritas, and Mexican martinis, as well as Mexican and American beers and a few other basic cocktails.

The transition from small, self-service taqueria to a five-times-larger restaurant venue hasn't been without issues. Service can be uneven – with some exceptions, servers seem overextended and undertrained. The air-conditioning isn't adequate to maintain optimal temperatures. The place is cavernous with very high ceilings, and – while the stone walls, tile floors, and bathrooms are beautiful – the dining areas feel rather spare and impersonal. Most importantly, when the chef isn't in the kitchen, the difference is noticeable (once I was served flimsy commercial chips instead of the divine totopos!). But these glitches are fixable, and I assume they will be taken care of. The food here is too exceptional to not be fully supported by consistent service and comfortable ambience. – *MM Pack*

and served with crostini. I shamelessly scraped every bite off the baking dish.

A few of the old standby menu items remain, perhaps in slightly different preparations: The flagship Shrimp Bess (\$14) with creole butter and ciabatta is still as delicious as we remembered; the shepherd's pie (\$12) now has cheddar cheese atop the mashed potato crust and comes with greens tossed in balsamic vinaigrette; the croque monsieur (\$13) is made on toasted pain au levain (all bread is made on-site at Walton's) with shaved Niman Ranch ham, toasted mustard, béchamel, and Mornay, served with Bess' addictive pommes frites. But there are also new items that captured our eye. The pan-roasted halibut (\$22) came atop creamy parsnip purée with an herb brown butter sauce, although the announced pea-shoot tendrils were just two sprigs for garnish instead of the sautéed greens I had imagined as a side dish. The lamb scallopini (\$20), a lamb loin cutlet sautéed until crispy, topped with lump crab meat, fried spinach, and lemon beurre blanc, was every bit as satisfying as it sounds. I was almost too full for dessert, but I'm a sucker for a lemon tart (\$6), and Bess' was everything I wished for: a crumbly crust and a tangy filling, served with blueberry coulis and candied lemon peel.

Although the prices are a bit higher than I'd like to spend on a regular lunch, the afternoon

menu also features a few new items that I was eager to sample. The fresh baby spinach salad (\$9) with yellow tomatoes, crispy chunks of pancetta, and a generous slice of goat cheese comes topped with a panko-crusted deepfried egg, a unique topping that makes this salad a complete, balanced meal. We chose the thyme-lemon dressing, but the homemade blue cheese would have likely been just as good a match. There are daily specials on weekdays, and on our visit we tried the baconwrapped meatloaf (\$14), a portion huge enough for two to share, studded with carrot and celery cubes and topped with a savory sauce that may just be the definition of umami. The accompanying mashed potatoes and grilled asparagus were the perfect sides. Bess also hosts happy hour during the convenient hours of 2:30-6:30pm with half-price, full-sized appetizers and drinks – as well as an enticing Sunday brunch that includes \$3 mimosas, Bloody Marys, and other brunchy libations plus Bess Eggs Benedict and shrimp and biscuits, among other offerings.

I'm happy to confirm that despite changes in personnel, Bess is still a place that I enjoy for the welcoming atmosphere, friendly and efficient service, and well-executed menu with something for everyone. Nothing is too weird or esoteric; it's just downright comfort food that hits the spot every time. – *Claudia Alarcón*

I loved how the tanginess of the artichokes remained intact under the rich golden crust and was complemented by the lemon slices, a marriage made in heaven and lovely with a glass of crisp Argentine Torrontes. We also shared the seafood gratin (\$10): diced shrimp, crab, and crawfish tossed in fontina cream, baked with a Parmesan crust,

Under the 'Boardwalk'

Just when I begin to worry that my tastes have become those of a 12-year-old boy, I remember that I'm still a rabid fan of AMC's Mad Men and Rubicon. "Too slow" is the common complaint I hear of these series. Or, in the case of Mad Men, which is set during the 1960s with its very distinct sense of fashion and style, some people grouse that it's all about the look. Well, I guess we'll have to agree to disagree. If it's action you want, see my loving endorsement of the new Hawaii Five-0 on the Picture in Picture blog (austinchronicle.com/pip). In the meantime, I've had some thoughts on the new thing that's supposed to knock our collective socks off: Boardwalk Empire.

The highly hyped HBO series is set in Atlantic City during the dawn of Prohibition. Luxury hotels along the boardwalk welcomed the rich and not so rich. As long as you had a little green (and you weren't black, Latino, or some other undesirable), you were welcome. "For a few dollars," HBO press materials state, "a working man could get away and live like a king – legally or illegally."

Now that's interesting - the seed for potential class conflict - and it's in the pilot, kind of. What is more present is the very thing critics complain about when trashing Mad Men: lots of attention to the scenery, perhaps because a big-screen filmmaker (Martin Scorsese) directed the pilot (written by Terence Winter). But that's not my biggest complaint. My biggest complaint is that I am not feeling **Steve Buscemi** in the lead role as Enoch "Nucky" Thompson. By day, Nucky is Atlantic City's treasurer, but being the brains behind the city's rum-running trade is his clandestine (and more lucrative) role. Nucky is a politician just as at ease charming the ladies of the Temperance League as he is cutting deals with shady characters eager to make a buck off booze. Nucky still carries a torch for his dead wife, has a soft spot for babies and women in need, and spends a lot of time staring into windows - presumably,

as a way for viewers to get a glimpse of Nucky's interior self. In the pilot episode, he looks through the window of a storefront featuring underweight babies (1920s boardwalk entertainment). Another

time, he's peering into the shop of a palm reader who looks up from her client to give Nucky one of those hard stares that is supposed to convey - what? Maybe viewers are supposed to collect these looks for a big reveal later, but I'm skeptical. Very skeptical, especially since remembering these snapshots are going to be a challenge week to week (perhaps Boardwalk Empire is destined to be one of those series best viewed during a long weekend on DVD). Buscemi, who is so great in, well, most everything else he's ever been in, seems strangely hemmed in here. Maybe it's the tailored suits. He seems most alive during humorous asides and double takes that are peppered throughout.

Fortunately, Buscemi has a strong supporting cast. **Kelly Macdonald** (stunning in HBO's 2005 TV movie *The Girl in the Cafe*) brings quiet intensity as a young mother who seeks Nucky's help, igniting what looks to be an ongoing relationship. **Michael Pitt** (*Last Days*) co-stars as Jimmy Darmody, a veteran recently returned home. He's eager to take his place as Nucky's rel

right-hand man and bristles when he's relegated to driver and errand boy. Waiting on Nucky gives Jimmy lots of time to chat up his fellow underlings, including a young Al Capone (**Stephen Graham**). In no time, they begin to work their own deals. But my favorite supporting character is Senior Prohibition Agent with the Department of Internal Revenue Nelson Van Alden, played by the chisel-faced Michael Shannon. Believing his mission to squash the rum-running trade is God's work, he is both scary and sympathetic. There's a lot going on under Van Alden's regulation fedora, and I'm curious to find out what it is.

THE MOVIE BUG

Touching down at the Toronto International Film Festival BY MARJORIE BAUMGARTEN

In its 35th year, the Toronto International Film Festival, known as TIFF, has moved into its permanent home. Getting there took lots more effort than a mere click of Dorothy's ruby-red slippers, but the biggest film festival on the North American continent, held this year from Sept. 9 through Sept. 19, now has a year-round base of operations as well as a cinema showcase of the highest order. The TIFF Bell Lightbox (yes, it bears the name of one of its major sponsors) was a

long time in coming, and promises of the structure's advent had begun to sound hollow in recent years. Yet on the fourth day of the 2010 festival, the Lightbox had its official unveiling, and the reaction among the otherwise divisively opinionated film community was one of universal consensus: The innovative building seals Toronto's reputation as a world mecca of cinema.

Five stories high, the TIFF Bell Lightbox seems spacious and airy. In addition to its five theatres and wideopen gathering space and hospitality areas, the Lightbox also houses Canada's renowned Film Reference Library and other education operations as well as a gallery with exhibition space. Despite the five theatres contained within, the Lightbox is nothing like today's multiscreen cineplexes. Each theatre is designed to be a box within a box, which means each screening room is a distinct structure cushioned by massive amounts of soundproofing in the walls and floors so that sounds from other theatres, streetcars, and the boisterous downtown neighborhood in which the new venue is located (a geographical change for the fest) do not intrude upon the viewing experience. The seats

are very comfortable, and the sight lines are terrific (even from the second row, where I pleasantly took in one movie).

The land to build the theatre comes from the Ivan Reitman family. As a child, the future director of *Animal House* and *Ghostbusters* emigrated to Canada with his family. His parents owned and operated a car wash in downtown Toronto on land that their children inherited and eventually donated to TIFF. This prime piece of real estate was one of the key factors in turning the Lightbox from dream to reality. In honor of the gift, the intersection in front of the building was dedicated as Reitman Square. Construction on a tower of condominiums above the Lightbox continues, where Reitman is rightfully set to become a penthouse resident. Daily screenings in the theatres and its location in the booming entertainment district make living in the towers an enticing proposition. A few days ago, I noticed this tweet from Roger Ebert: "A guy like me, I can see retiring to a condo in the TIFF Bell Lightbox and just going to movies." (And speaking of Ebert, the man is far from retired. He is writing more voluminously than ever. In Toronto this year, he hosted a one-of-a-kind tweet-off event in TIFF's

> new Filmmakers Lounge. And, following this summer's conclusion of *At the Movies*, the groundbreaking movie-review show that ran for many years, under several permutations, Ebert announced just prior to TIFF's opening the start of a new show called *Roger Ebert Presents: At the Movies* with hosts Christy Lemire and Elvis Mitchell – excellent choices to ensure the continuance of the show's feisty intelligence.)

Enough about buildings. What about the movies? I saw several films in Toronto that are due to come out in the coming weeks and months, as it's common for distributors to use the festival as a launching pad for their fall offerings and awards-season fare. The King's Speech is the highlight for me of this group, an opinion that was echoed by its selection to receive the Cadillac People's Choice Award. At the film's heart are the terrific performances of Colin Firth and Geoffrey Rush, who respectively play King George VI of Great Britain and the speech therapist who helped the monarch overcome his stammer. Other films in the fall-release category include Woody Allen's You Will Meet a Tall Dark Stranger (which is another variation on the same movie Allen's been making for the last several years) and Clint

Eastwood's *Hereafter* (which is thoroughly different from anything the director has made previously). Also scheduled for wide release this fall are *Let Me In* (the effective American remake of *Let the Right One In*, which uses a vampire story to tell a poignant tale of adolescent angst; it screens in Austin at Fantastic Fest), *Never Let Me Go* (Mark Romanek's melancholic slice of science fiction), and *Stone* (a taut thriller acted by Edward Norton, Robert De Niro, and Milla Jovavich, also playing Fantastic Fest). The film I most regret missing is also the one that garnered some of the biggest buzz: Darren Aronofsky's ballet melodrama *Black Swan*, which stars Natalie Portman. (It will screen at the Austin Film Festival in October.)



Toronto marks another stop for some films traveling the festival circuit. Among these, I saw Alejandro González Iñárritu's Biutiful, which features a tour de force performance by Javier Bardem in an otherwise sentimental narrative, and Cannes Palme d'Or winner Uncle Boonmee Who Can Recall His Past Lives by Apichatpong Weerasethakul, an ethereal film that mostly left me mystified. Blue Valentine, the heart-wrenching story of love gone sour, which stars Michelle Williams and Ryan Gosling, stopped in Toronto after presentations at Sundance and Cannes (it plays at AFF as well). Venice carryovers I saw include Detective Dee and the Mystery of the Phantom Flame, in which Tsui Hark directs an engaging period mystery tale that stars Andy Lau as a Sherlock Holmesian detective whose deductions are founded in scientific methods, and Álex de la Iglesia's dual prizewinner at Venice, Balada Triste (also screening at Fantastic Fest), which uses outrageous visual touches to recount the Spanish conflicts among clowns, fascists, sadists, and other lovers.

My favorite film I saw is Susanne Bier's *In a Better World*. I spoke briefly with the Danish director of *Open Hearts*, *Brothers*, and *Things We Lost in the Fire*, and she refused to describe what her film is about, an action I found annoying at the time but understand better in retrospect. It's difficult to summarize but nevertheless a magnificent achievement. Werner Herzog had the only 3-D film in the festival, *Cave of Forgotten Dreams*, and basically schooled everyone in the effective use of 3-D in this documentary about the discovery of the world's oldest cave drawings.

I returned to Texas with only one foot blister and no bedbugs (bedbugs having been the major prefestival scare among visitors). To the best of my knowledge, none were reported in any of the hotels or theatres, as had been whispered prior to the fest. And the only scabs to be found were at the Fairmont Royal York hotel, where workers were on strike and brought their picket line down to the festival headquarters. Martin Sheen, in town for the premiere of his son Emilio Estevez's *The Way*, was prominently seen joining their ranks. In Toronto, there's something for everyone.



GREEN IS GOOD Edward Norton reintroduces 'Leaves of Grass' to Austin

"I love where I'm from," said Tim Blake Nelson on the origins of his Whitman-and-weed comedy *Leaves of Grass.* "He wrote [it] into the movie," chimed in his star and producer Edward Norton. "'Don't you talk down on Oklahoma!'"

The *Chronicle* sat down with Nelson and Norton in March 2009 when the film

screened at the South by Southwest Film Festival – ostensibly on the eve of its theatrical release. Distributor woes scrapped that plan, but *Leaves of Grass* arrives in Austin this weekend. The timing couldn't have worked out better: Norton, who will be in town for Fantastic Fest in support of his new film *Stone*, will be on hand to introduce *Leaves of Grass* at 8pm on its opening night (Friday) at the Alamo Drafthouse at the Ritz.

Passion Project

Thirteen years after its first incarnation at 409 Colorado in Downtown Austin, Texas, Tim and Karrie League's Alamo Drafthouse Cinema(s) have unforeseeably but perhaps inevitably taken over a vast fanboy- and fangrrrl-

filled swath of the pop cultural spectrum, and thank goodness for that. Within Austin's boundaries – which, given the blogosphere, are in fact no longer actually *within* Austin's boundaries – the shorthanded "Alamo" is so omnipresent in our daily

lives that we might as well raze that rickety old San Antonio mission and replace it with a far more profitable Drafthouse drive-in.

Following Tim League's return to CEO status last year, the Alamo and its various permutations, offshoots, and side projects

– the HighBall, Mondo Tees, the American Genre Film Archive, a plethora of impending Drafthouse groundbreakings – has become, like its namesake, inescapable. You know you've become a cine-hip cultural arbiter when Alan Ladd's granddaughter sports your logo across her chest (see Quentin Tarantino's *Death Proof*) or when – in five sudden years – you're suddenly playing host and co-creator (alongside that other geek culture godhead, Harry "Ain't It Cool News" Knowles) to one of the most reliably exciting international film festivals in the country. Let's call it The Year of the Alamo.

Which brings us to Fantastic Fest 2010. As previous years' attendees know, FF provides a relentless barrage of the *crème de le sang* of genre films, stars, and directors (notably, lifetime achievement award winners Roger Corman and wife/co-producer/co-conspirator Julie Corman, plus HK martial arts director and choreographer Yuen Woo-Ping); extremely questionable yet undeniably cool surprise events (among them this year: fun with handguns and crucified ungulates); an orgy

of gaming and parties); and, lest we forget, more righteously kickass filmmaking than you will ever have time to watch. (Believe us, we've tried, and our eyeballs exploded just 18 films in.)

Teutonic zombie hellscapes? *Check!* Filipino dictators directing *yanqui* cash flow? *Hell yeah!* Brazen use of karaoke rooms for purposes other than singing the theme from *Cannibal Holocaust* off-key? *Ohmyfuckyes!* Fantastic Fest 2010: Let the revel commence.



A Wild Ride: Roger Corman

C'mon, do we really need to write an intro for Roger friggin' Corman, the man behind X: The Man With the X-Ray Eyes, all the best American International Pictures pictures, The Little Shop of Horrors, and The Wild Angels? Who jump-started the careers of Jack Nicholson, Joe Dante, and John Sayles? Who ran New World Pictures and then New Horizons Pictures and produced Piranha, Dinocroc, Supergator, and – making its theatrical premiere at Fantastic Fest 2010 – the bitey, sucky, oozy horror that is Sharktopus?

Didn't think so.

Austin Chronicle: You're 84 years old and arriving in Austin with the already legendary Sharktopus! To what do you attribute your ceaseless cinematic activity?

Roger Corman: Simply, I *love* making motion pictures. It's just that. I've loved it from the beginning, and I'll never retire. As long as I can do it, I'll keep doing it.

AC: Looking back at a career that spans over an astonishing, nay fantastic, 450 pictures that you either directed or produced, what's been the most consistently engaging part of the motion-picture process for you?

RC: Probably coming up with the original idea. Coming up with the concept, the germ of

Oh, Ho, Oslo! Norwegian Spotlight

Velkommen, filmmakers of Norway! This year's spotlight nation at Fantastic Fest may not have the cinematic cachet of some of its Scandinavian neighbors (hey, Sweden, not everyone gets an Ingmar Bergman), but if you think its contribution to film ends with subbing for Hoth on The Empire Strikes Back and providing moose jokes for Monty Python and the Holy Grail, it's time to reconsider the icy nation's cultural possibilities.

Of course, smart genre-watchers have anticipated a mini-invasion coming for a while. Some point to 2006's *Cold Prey (Fritt Vilt)* as the breakthrough Norwegian horror, adding the frigid terror of the Jotunheim mountains to the serial killer genre. Other gorehounds give the bloody nod to *Dead Snow (Død Snø)*, 2009's



contender for best Nazi zombie comedy-horror. Both films prove that Norwegians are among Europe's toughest bastards (few films contain so much auto-surgery), but there's also a display of the nation's dry and earthy humor. As one soon-to-be-victim in *Dead Snow* comments, all the good jokes involve pee, poop, and semen, and while *Fatso* is short on the pee and poop, well, it makes up for it with what's behind door No. 3. Pumping some new blood into the limp schtick of the sex comedy, the film belongs to Nils Jørgen Kaalstad. As schlubby, painfully shy protagonist Rino, his simple life of drawing comics and compulsively masturbating is interrupted when his father imposes new roommate Malin (the elfin Josefin Ljungman) on him. There's something of the young John Candy about Kaalstad – the constant twitching, the discomfort in his own skin, all offset by a warmhearted charm – that sticks with the audience long after the Fleshlight gags have been rinsed away.

More familiar to American audiences will be the reigning king of Scandinavian cinema, Swedish-born Stellan Skarsgård, reunited with director and longtime collaborator Hans Petter Moland for A Somewhat Gentle Man (En ganske snill mann). However, this is a long way from their previous work together on either 2000's intense family drama Aberdeen or 1995's blood-flecked frontier drama Zero Kelvin. The recently translated trailer indicates a dark gangster comedy, with Skarsgård as a paroled hit man for the Norwegian mob.

Don't look for even a trace of social realism in Norwegian Ninja (Kommandør Treholt & ninjatroppen). Adapting his 2006 satirical novel Ninjateknikk II: Usynlighet i Strid 1978, Thomas Cappelen Malling's directorial debut looks like a simple spoof on old grindhouse-friendly martial arts flicks (with added fjords). Dig a little deeper and it's a snow-covered, spin-kicking answer to Confessions of a Dangerous Mind, a berserk fictionalized rewriting of the true story of convicted Soviet spy Arne Treholt. How true? It's unlikely that Norwegian diplomats ever shot lightning from their hands. Although that could just be another thing you don't know about Norway. – Richard Whittaker

All screenings are at the Alamo Drafthouse South. the story, and the development of the story. *Everything*, in my opinion, stems from that initial decision, that story.

AC: Speaking of great stories, I first fell in love with your work when the Edgar Allan Poe series you directed for Samuel Z. Arkoff and James H. Nicholson's American International Pictures hit television syndication in the Seventies. Sadly, it looks as though the days of contemporary and iconic horror film stars such as Vincent Price are long behind us in today's Hollyweird world. Why do you think that is?

RC: I think there are a number of reasons. The primary one is that most mediumbudget horror films – which is what the Poe films were, they were neither inexpensive nor expensive – do not play theatrical release anymore. They go straight to DVD. Back then, you had time to build a star such as Vincent Price – or, earlier, Boris Karloff or, later, Christopher Lee – through a series of pictures that played in theatres. They became stars for that reason. And that's not done anymore.

AC: Let's talk about the digital filmmaking revolution of the past decade or so. It's now possible for anyone with modest means and the wherewithal to become a "filmmaker." And this is nowhere more noticeable than in the realm of genre filmmaking, where the direct-to-video store shelves and video-on-demand streams are overflowing with hastily and often poorly shot product that is as much an argument for the slower pace of shooting on actual film as it is an incitement for a new generation of homemade auteurs to get out there and just do it. Thoughts?


RC: I'm very much in favor of digital cameras, and I think the whole transition to digital is wonderful. We still shoot some of our films - I keep calling them films when I should really call them "pictures" - on film, but we shoot, I'd say, half of them digitally and half on film. ... [O]ver the next year or two we will probably phase out of film completely. Shooting on digital cameras provide[s] so many great advantages: They're easier to hold, they're less expensive, and you also save on film and lab. Just about anybody can make a film today, and you're completely correct in what you say: Most of these films are no good. But a number of them are, and I think it gives a great opportunity for sort of a winnowingout. Out of 100 of these digital films, 99 are going to be bad, but somebody will emerge from nowhere that nobody's ever heard of and become an important filmmaker through this process.

Sharktopus will have its world premiere at the Paramount Theatre Friday, Sept. 24, 11:55pm. Roger and Julie Corman will receive a Lifetime Achievement Award just prior to the screening.

Zombies Reconnecting With Their Roots: Howard J. Ford and 'The Dead'

You say you've seen your share of zombie flicks. You were weaned on George A. Romero's *Dawn of the Dead*? You can quote chapter and verse from *The Living Dead at the Manchester Morgue*? Maybe the revenant form is so overexposed, you're possibly feeling just a tad zombified yourself? Not to worry. British directing duo (and siblings) Howard J. Ford and Jonathan Ford are about to blow what little remains of your curds 'n' whey out the back of your previously semisolid noggin. Their film *The Dead* returns the zombie mythos to its East African roots – to the war-torn killing fields of Sierra Leone, specifically – and looks, sounds, and feels like a breath of fresh, rotting, sun-dappled human meat pie. Eat up.

Austin Chronicle: Can you remember the first zombie movie that you saw – when, where, and how it affected you?

Howard Ford: The first zombie movie I ever saw was George Romero's *Dawn of the Dead*. I must have been 12, I think, at the time, and it had an incredible impact on me. I vividly recall going home afterward so terrified that we literally walked in the center of the road because we felt like at any moment we could be grabbed by a zombie. It just felt like the horror was all around us. I've never forgotten that.

AC: Was Jacques Tourneur's I Walked With a Zombie an influence on The Dead? Virtually all of your zombies look and move like undead kin to Darby Jones' titular revenant in Tourneur's film. **HF:** Actually, I don't think either one of us has ever seen that film, although it came up in discussion while my brother and I were writing the script.

AC: I think it's a stroke of genius to return the zombie mythos to its birthplace in Africa.

HF: One of the very first zombie legends comes out of Benin, in French-speaking West Africa, in fact.

AC: The Dead was shot entirely on location in one of the poorest and most dangerous regions in the world. That had to be a challenge.

HF: It's really hard for me to put into words how tough it was trying to get this movie in the can and out of Africa. We didn't just take the safe route or the relatively safe route even. We went into the middle of nowhere. We shot in locations where people from the Western world have quite literally never been before, let alone actually shot a movie there. **AC**: How'd that work out for you?

HF: How much space do you have? I was mugged at knifepoint on day one. I had a huge hunting knife put to my chest and another small knife put up to my ribs. All my cash and cards were taken, including my driving license. And then they tried to put me in jail for driving without a license. So we were constantly paying off armed police. We'd encounter a whole number of guys with AK-47 machine guns while driving through the middle of Africa. We were stopped at gunpoint probably on average every other day, in our time in Africa. Money was extorted from us. Some people call it corruption; some people call it doing whatever is necessary to put food on your family's table in a poor country. Whichever way you look at it, it's very frustrating when you're trying to get a movie in the can.

AC: Are you sure Werner Herzog wasn't orchestrating all this from afar?

HF: I've never seen worse. Our lead actor, Rob Freeman, contracted malaria, collapsed on set shortly after we got going. He started convulsing and was rushed to hospital. He had fullblown malaria so much so that the doctor said he would have been dead within three days, possibly two days, but most certainly within three days had he not been treated immediately. He was on an IV drip for a total of two weeks at the shoot.

AC: Not exactly the kind of dead you were going for. **HF**: Not really, no. And we actually met *real* cannibals.

AC: No.

HF: Yes! It was very strange; we were filming a scene when Murphy, the main character, is hiding in the corn fairly shortly after he gets to shore. And, um, a *real* cannibal passed by on a bicycle ...

AC: Okay, retract what I said about Herzog. This is obviously Alejandro Jodorowsky's doing.

HF: ... and our local translator revealed to us that this guy was, indeed, a local cannibal. He saw our white-eyed, flesh-eating zombies, and he was really excited about what we were up to. So our translator revealed to me that this guy eats people in his village when they die. Apparently he doesn't kill anyone, you know, as far as we are aware, he just eats the dead. Someone made a joke about, you know, had he tried some white meat? And the cannibal sort of laughed and looked at our thighs, kind of thing. Actually, we were kind of uneasy.

AC: What kind of difficulties did shooting in the heat of equatorial Africa present for the makeup effects? I imagine latex melts.

HF: Yeah, you're absolutely right, and that's exactly what happened. All the props outside of the costumes, the equipment, the generator, the lights, everything else was shipped in from the UK. Max Van De Banks was our special makeup effects artist, and, along with Dan Rickard, he created all the body parts. Everything from fake hands to fake limbs. And yes, they started to melt incredibly quickly. So sometimes they're just seen on the ground as a bit of mush.

From Spain, Con Amor: Eugenio Mira and 'Agnosia'

Just as Germans love David Hasselhoff, Spaniards love Fantastic Fest, and none more so than Eugenio Mira, the self-professed "prophet" spreading the word of FF far and wide. His newest film is a dark and eerie tale of romantic treachery, mysterious malaises, and black balloons buffeted amidst a historical background. Utterly dissimilar from his debut feature *The Birthday Party*, *Agnosia* instead calls to mind the grim fairy tales of Guillermo del Toro and Juan Antonio Bayona. It's a poetic sort of horror, but no less scare-ific for its lyrical story and sublime, haunting images.

Austin Chronicle: What's the story behind Agnosia?

Eugenio Mira: You have to keep in mind that because in Spain there is a lack of a film industry, individuals like me, Nacho Vigalondo, Koldo Serra (who made The Backwoods), and [Buried director] Rodrigo Cortés, who all loved movies in high school, have gone on to become pieces of a machinery that didn't exist. In my case, for example, I always wanted to direct movies when I was a teenager, but finally you realize that you have to develop your own stuff, your own scripts, or go out and look for a producer. No producer is going to be looking for an author and a director to put together. At least, that's how it was in the Nineties in Spain. Let's say my generation, we've been forced to [do a little bit of everything]. But really, some of us just want to write movies, and others only want to direct movies.

The funny thing about *Agnosia*, and why it's so different from *The Birthday*, is that *The Birthday* came from my own private universe.

With Agnosia, my particular way of seeing things [was combined with] a particular story [written by Antonio Trashorras, who also wrote *The Devil's Backbone*] that didn't necessarily come from myself. Don't get me wrong. I loved to be considered an author with *The Birthday* and whatnot, but I long to be taking care of a project exclusively from the director's chair.

I can honestly say now that I'm 32, I've been able not only to do my dream, but with *Agnosia*, do someone else's dream, and then take it to new and interesting places.

AC: Would it be fair to say that there's something of a renaissance going on in Spanish fantastic cinema? **EM:** Well, in Spain, we were the guys who wanted to move from our hometowns, and we all collided in Madrid or in Barcelona in the mid-Nineties. It's definitely a unique generation of filmmakers who have come together to create an industry where there was none.

AC: Your directorial style on Agnosia is so unique. What were some of your influences growing up?

EM: I always say that I was a child of the Eighties. I wouldn't be where I am today if it were not for people like Robert Zemeckis, Joe Dante, Steven Spielberg, John Landis, that older generation that had a really, really strong passion for movies and who also had a great knowledge of the cinematic language. They were doing something that wasn't too respected because they were mainstream movies, but the cinematic quality of those movies are legendary. On top of that, in Spain, if you are 9 years old, you are allowed to go into the theatre to see a film like Blue Velvet or Terry Gilliam's Time Bandits or the Coen brothers - all filmmakers and artists with very strong, individual visions. They are like musicians in terms of camera placement and composing. That's what caught my attention when I was a kid and still does to this day.

Joystick Junkies Unite Fantastic Arcade

Plopping Austin's biggest gaming personality, Richard Garriott, in the keynote speaker position at the head of the Fantastic Arcade – just before a panel titled Declaration of Independents – might feel like a slap in the face to all things indie. The guy has enough clout and cash to go to space, for chrissakes. However, the man was sending out plastic baggies full of floppy discs labeled "Akalabeth" before most of the snot-nosed Johnny-comelatelies who largely populate this new gaming arm of Fantastic Fest were even having 8-bit wet dreams. Who better than the unofficial father of DIY programming to sound the indie gaming alarm?

It doesn't have the cultural cachet that indie movies or music have (or had, depending on how you look at it), but the hope is that some folks outside of the insular circle of indie gamers and designers will recognize where a large amount of the original ideas come from. The Fantastic Arcade could go so far as to convince some nongamers that one doesn't need to spend 40 hours shooting impeccably rendered aliens to be part of the club. Now is your chance to spend time with the cool kids of game design, because they'll all be drinking and high-fiving one another in the back parking lot of the HighBall. That is, when they aren't putting on their professional faces for the panels, game demos, and screenings.

Those professional faces will be lit up by the glowing screens filling the HighBall ballroom, transformed into an old-timey (read: Eighties) arcade replete with games placed in those mammoth cabinets of yore. Spotlight games will be playable and vying for your audience award vote. If voting isn't your thing, the showcase games also run the gamut from art games (like Superbrothers' Sword & Sworcery EP) to message games (Operation: Pedopriest has a message, right?) to polarizing titles (Super Columbine Massacre RPGI; self-explanatory) to locally made titles (e.g, Canabalt, Spider: The Secret of Bryce Manor). The campus-area video-game emporium Arcade UFO will host

daily gaming tournaments, including a *Left 4 Dead 2* killing spree set in the virtual Alamo Drafthouse of your nightmares.

Need a break from the inundation of pixels? Check out the realworld panels on gaming's present and future, starting with indie poster child Jonathan Blow and others talking about game design sans endless bureaucracy (see our interview with Jonathan Blow on the Screens blog at **austinchronicle.com/pip**). Other questions to ponder at the panels: why so many games involve elves, why movies based on video games can't be good, and why Texas is lousy with program-it-yourself game designers. Any remaining questions will be drowned out in the bleeps and bloops nearby. *– James Renovitch*

Reanimating Poe: Jeffrey Combs and 'Nevermore'

The once and future Herbert West: Reanimator brings the Texas debut of his live, one-man/one-madness live performance Nevermore ... An Evening With Edgar Allan Poe to Fantastic Fest this year. Given the genrehound audience, we'll forgive you for never having caught Hal Holbrook onstage incarnating Mark Twain (but we bet you've seen Shatner do Hamlet). Forget that Huckleberry jazz, though: Jeffrey Combs is channeling the other greatest American author ever, Edgar Allan Poe, he of the raven-black coif and the unquenchable thirst for Amontillado.

Austin Chronicle: Did you grow up reading Poe, like I did and everybody I know?

Jeffrey Combs: Sure. Every American in their adolescence is introduced to Poe. But I can't say that I went real deep into his work at all. The one-man show actually came out of left field in a way. I love history, and about five or six years ago I was looking around for a historical figure to play. I started reading different things with an eye towards finding someone in history that I could maybe portray. I came across a Poe biography, and I actually scoffed at reading it because I was looking to branch out and not be, quite frankly, once again thought of as only a horror actor, you know?

AC: Poe is certainly a plum role as far as American literary figures go.


IC: I thought it was almost too on the nose, but his life story is just so powerful and sad to not do. He's someone who had had so many misfortunes and died early and tragically, yet left behind such an incredible legacy of literature and poetry and science and science fiction. And he created the detective story. I mean, he had just an allencompassing brilliance. He's like America's Van Gogh.

AC: You played Poe – a fictional variation thereof - in Stuart Gordon's "The Black Cat" episode of Masters of Horror.

JC: Right. The seed was planted! A year or so went by, and I finally went back to Stuart and we began creating a structure for the [theatrical show] and picking pieces that I was drawn to, just kind of finding a story that we could tell in an evening.

AC: How much research did you do, and what were some of the most surprising things that you discovered about Poe that you perhaps were unaware of going into this?

JC: At the beginning, I did not fully realize that there wouldn't be a Sherlock Holmes if it weren't for Poe. I was unaware that Arthur Conan Doyle got the inspiration for Holmes from reading Poe's stories. The type of detective who could deduce the trail of a crime with just the evidence in front of him. We take that for granted now. We've got Agatha Christie, and we've got Arthur Conan; we've got Sherlock Holmes; we've got Hercule Poirot; we've got, we've got Monk; we've got



innumerable examples of that sort of detective. But Poe was the first to do that. AC: And that's not the half of it.

JC: Oh yeah, they also credit him with writing the first science-fiction story. He got into metaphysics. He wrote a book called Eureka, which is very difficult to get through but it's all about the metaphysics of the universe. The guy's intellect was just endless. For a man who was supposedly a drunk, he was a prodigious writer. If he wasn't writing a story or a poem, he [was writing] a play or a book or he was writing literary criticism and essays. He was an editor. Poe wore so many hats, and he did them all exceptionally well. And in a short, short life. I'm awestruck.

AC: The cause of Poe's death is still very much in dispute. What do you think led to his ultimate demise?

JC: I think it was probably a combination of things. First and foremost, he was not in good health. His heart was having problems. My personal belief is that somehow, in some way, he got rolled, mugged, because he was found in somebody else's clothes, he was delirious, and I suspect he might have gotten beat up. A combination of an unfortunate encounter mixed with failing health. AC: What's your favorite poem by Poe?

JC: I actually like one of his early poems called "Alone," because I think it encapsulates who he is. And the ... "forever the outsider" [idea]. I mean, you know, [paraphrasing the poem]: "I don't see things as other people see them. I don't feel things the way people ... I see in a mountain or in a cloud, I ... you see a cloud, I see a demon. I see the threat."

I think that it was a brutally melancholy and honest poem. He wrote it when he was about 20, and I do it in the show. And it really just sings to me. Other people have their favorite, but I like that one.



Modern radio is in the midst of a massive paradigm shift. The industry's foundation, the **Arbitron** ratings, has upgraded from a stone-age diary system to **Portable People Meters.** The pagerlike devices, known as **PPM**, digitally track encoded radio signals, creating an intensely detailed account of partici-

pants' listening habits (see "Media Watch," Dec. 25, 2009). Across the dial, the change has already led to countless tweaks: more standard playlists and 1990s reruns, less

Austin's **KOOP Radio** couldn't care less.

On Aug. 31, **KUT** and **University Unions** formalized their **memorandum** of understanding in regard to the management of the **Cactus Cafe**. It's a sweet deal for the local **NPR** affiliate. The initial 10-year agreement grants the station not only the exclusive license to the name and trademark of the Cactus but also the right to suspend activity at the venue "for up to two years to raise the funds necessary to continue operations, or to terminate this agreement entirely." Surprisingly, while University Unions is responsible for maintaining the bar operations, the revenue derived from concession sales will actually be retained by KUT after all hard and soft costs have been absorbed.

Moving forward through the past, the **Pixies**' *Doolittle* rewind at the **Austin Music Hall** on Tuesday was a well-scripted romp performed by moving statues. Bassist **Kim Deal** served as host ("Now each of you have to get up and turn the record over to side two"), while **Black Francis** gave voice to the grotesque surrealism of **Luis Buñuel**'s *Un Chien Andalou* in "Debaser" and **Joey Santiago** free-associated on lead guitar. Beginning with a four-song B-side prequel, the Pixies traced their 1989 masterpiece with razor precision, right down to the whistling and the "shake your butt" commands of drummer **David Lovering's** suave "La La Love You." The encore sealed the deal, with the B-side slow version of "Wave of Mutilation," a few greatest hits ("Where Is My Mind?," "Gigantic"), and unexpected **Neil Young** stunner "Winterlong."

Huddled in the parking lot of ThunderCloud Subs on Riverside on Tuesday, Hollywood Gossip made the perfect poster band for the fifth annual Health Alliance for Austin Musicians Benefit **Day**: four young, working musicians taking a break from their day jobs to drum up support for the local nonprofit, which provides low-cost medical, dental, and mental health services to more than 1,300 Austin artists. "When you tour and have to take whatever work you can get, HAAM's really invaluable," offered singer/guitarist Tyler Womack. Though their audience wasn't a lunchtime rush in terms of attendance, the local quartet still delivered a 60-minute set of tart, whimsical pop that recalled early Belle & Sebastian in Womack's tales of young love and restless nights. Melodymaker

Texan/Slayer Tom Araya

"You're reaching me in Palestine," replied Tom Araya over the phone in late July, pronouncing it "Pales-teen" in correcting me. "I thought it was pronounced 'Pales-tyne' too, but they've corrected me many times. I've lived here 15 years."

He laughs – as Araya will do easily and often over the next hour even though tomorrow he departs his 63-acre ranch in East Texas for another Slayer tour. Modern metal's best mane for 30 years running, death mask for lightning storm guitarists Kerry King and Jeff Hanneman, and one-quarter of Slayer's original four including drum maquiladora Dave Lombardo, the Chilean singer/bassist, whose family moved to Los Angeles before he hit preschool, certainly sounds Texan, interrupting our conversation when his family outing pulls into a parking lot.

"We're in Palestine right now, and we're going into ... Supercenter Walmart!" Araya exclaims. "Dude! I'm missing out! They're going in the store without me!"

With Slayer not raining down on Austin since a two-night siege of La Zona Rosa in 2002, live music capitalists are also missing out when the metal institution performs its 1990 hollow point kill *Seasons in the Abyss* this weekend – Friday (Dallas), Saturday (San Antonio), Sunday (Houston) – everywhere but here. For this, even Slayer's late-career peak *World Painted Blood* last year proves no salve. Perhaps there really is no God.

Austin Chronicle: Now that you've lived in Texas 15 years, do you feel Texan?

Tom Araya: Yeah. Yeah, I sure do. I sure do. And I understand why there's a whole Texas mentality. It's very different from an American mentality.

AC: How would you describe it?

TA: Very proud. A very proud mentality. It all stems from the fact that Texas was a republic. Well, it's still its own republic [laughs]. **AC:** By the time you moved to Palestine, Slayer had been playing Texas for years.

TA: Oh yeah. One of our very first tours, when we were on Metal Blade with *Haunting the Chapel*, we did here in Texas. That was at the very beginning of Slayer's career.

AC: San Antonio has a reputation as one of the metal capitals of the world. Slayer's played those places. Is the Alamo City's reputation well earned?

TA: Yeah, very. San Antonio I remember very well because there was another band from that time that was from San Antonio. They had the same name: Slayer. We did a show with them and after the show *we* carried the name [laughs]. That was done in San Antonio – the metal capital.

AC: You grew up speaking Spanish.

TA: Yeah, English and Spanish, but mainly Spanish because of my parents.

AC: How's your Spanish these days?

TA: Not great. Not great since it was only limited to my parents. My other siblings, we all spoke English to each other. My father passed away quite a few years back, but when I'm around my mom I speak Spanish, and it tends to get better the more I speak to her.

AC: You still have family in Chile.

TA: Yeah. Actually, all the family I have. There's a few relatives here in the States, but there aren't that many. You're talking maybe one or two. But yeah, the majority of my family is still in Chile.

AC: Does playing Chile feel like a homecoming to you?

TA: Oh yeah, yeah. We played Chile starting in '93, and we've gone back maybe four times, or South America I should say. It always feels like a homecoming to me, because that's how I'm treated, especially in Chile. Everyone there treats me as a native son that's done very well for himself. They make the trip special. All the Chilean fans do.

AC: Did your folks get to experience one of those huge stadium shows?

TA: Yeah, in Chile.

AC: Did they "get it"?

TA: That's the one thing that's very special about this band – our families. Not only my family, but Jeff, Kerry, and Dave's family. When the band first came together, their parents would come to our shows and watch us perform at the Hollywood clubs that allowed us to play. They had an idea what the band was about and the style of music we were playing. As far as a big audience, my parents got an opportunity to witness that in 1990, when we did a show at the L.A. Sports Arena, which was sold out, 13,000 people. It was us and Testament. They were able to witness the extent of the audience that we have. And then of course when we played Chile, I flew them there so they could be a part of our first show ever in Chile. My parents were very supportive of the band. In recent years, it's basically been my family coming to shows, with some of Kerry's older siblings also coming out.

AC: Kerry has said that the new Slayer album's about spreading a little hate worldwide.

TA: Kerry's philosophy in life He's been disenchanted with religion, I guess [laughs]. He's made a living writing songs about how much he hates it [laughs again]. That's the best

way I can approach that, because I'm somewhat of a religious person. I have a very core belief in God, and nothing can change that; nothing will change that. Even what I do in this band for the past 30 years hasn't changed that. Kerry feels he's on a mission [laughs]. And I don't judge him for it. He's a great songwriter. **AC:** For a band with such prolific songwriters in its two guitarists, both of the band's Grammys have been for compositions to which you've contributed – "Final Six" and

TA: Yeah. "Final Six" was a song Jeff put together, and I helped him in the studio as far as lyrics and how

it was sung. That's basically what I do. If they let me do my part in the studio that's what I bring to the table. A lot of the stuff that Kerry writes, in the past, if you took liberties with things, it was not appreciated. That's kind of why Jeff and I work together, because Jeff appreciates what I do and help him out with. And yeah, a lot of the songs we end up doing live are the songs I helped write. Which is kind of awkward [laughs]. I don't write anything musically. I'm basically a lyricist and a melodymaker. **AC:** You played a large part in the composition of "Eyes of the Insane," which landed you your first Grammy. Were Kerry and Jeff like, "WTF?"

TA: Especially with that song, it had a lot to do with the time. It being nominated for a Grammy had a lot to do with the subject matter. Everybody is big on the war, and that song's about what these soldiers go through psychologically when they get home. There's always a lot of background stuff when a band starts writing material. I wasn't really allowed to do much in recent years.



When *Christ Illusion* came together, I did what I would normally contribute. There was a time when none of my stuff was being used at all, as far as creativeness and lyrics for music and song. When I won the Grammy, that was the first song that I had written on my own. It was kind of a vindication for me. After that, on this last record, I contributed quite a bit [laughs]. **AC:** Where do your two Grammys live?

TA: They live right up on the mantle above the fireplace.

AC: Pretty sweet, eh?

TA: Very nice to look at.

AC: You said it was the right time for "Eyes of the Insane," and it's the same for World Painted Blood. The world's such a volatile mess, and the new album bottles that perfectly.

TA: I feel the same way. When the record was coming together, it felt that way to me. I could tell a lot of the subject matter we were writing about was so right on. I think that a lot of our albums are like that. They capture the time and period. That's kind of a unique thing with this band. When you look back at all the albums and when they were released and the material on the albums, and then you compare it to the time frame, it's pretty freaky [chuckles].

AC: It's sad, in a way, that Slayer keeps making extreme albums and they keep reflecting the times. Times are always extreme, but when you're living in them, it's even worse.

TA: I have to agree with you there – that we live in extreme times now. Even in an album nobody can see it. They don't put two and two together. It's kinda like, "Oh, it's a cool record," and that's the extent of it. They don't really pay attention to the times and what the songs are actually saying, and then compare it to what life is like now.

AC: Metal has become so amelodic, but if you go back to the bands that Slayer and Metallica were listening to originally – Thin Lizzy, CONTINUED ON P.54

Judas Priest, UFO – it's all essentially pop songs, hooks, riffs. World Painted Blood brims with lyrical hooks, like in "Snuff," with its refrain of "torture, misery, endless suffering."

TA: If you notice on South of Heaven and Seasons [in the Abyss], the songs were pretty traditional. They had verses, melodies, and little lead sections. On this new album, even with Christ Illusion, I was able to do what I do, and it's pretty noticeable when you compare it to the albums in between, from Divine Intervention on to God Hates Us All. You can tell what my influence was on a lot of songs. It's the melodies that I'd come up with. Even though there's a lot of barking and very monotone type of stuff, I still try to put the melody into it. I try to find the melody in it, period. I try to get a melody out of what's given to me.

A lot of times when Jeff and Kerry come up with ideas, they don't really have melodies. They have a cadence. They know how they want the song sung and have an idea how it's sung, but I'm the one that when I get it, I sit there and start thinking, "Okay, this is the cadence: 'La, la, la, la – la, la, la, la, la, la.' And I have to take that "la, la, la, la" and put waveform into it – make it a melody, not so much barking. A good example would be God Hates Us All. That album was a miserable album for me, because if you listen to it, you know that I didn't have any part in the melodies of any of the songs. If I would have, the album would be a little more tolerable [laughs]. It's pretty much a balls-out screaming/yelling type of record. It's a little brutal to the ear.

AC: The black metal documentary Until the Light Takes Us uses thrash metal of the 1980s as a jumping-off point for the whole European metal scene that followed. Do you see it that way - that it evolved out of what Slayer was doing?

TA: You know, yeah ... I guess. Yeah. We came up with this thrash metal, and then other bands come out and think, "We can play faster." That was the theory behind this new metal music, that they could be faster, that they could have more growling vocals. It evolved into: "Okay, let's see who can play faster. Who can sing the deepest and more growliest and not be understood at all." [laughs] Know what I mean? That was just something that evolved on its own. When we did Reign in Blood, we did it knowing that we weren't going to follow it with another fast record. We knew better than to just try and repeat that, because that's not what we're about. We want to be the fastest and the heaviest, but it wasn't about being faster than everyone else or seeing who could play the fastest. You got to do it with style and taste [chuckles]. That's what we stuck to. We stuck to style and taste.

AC: Is it weird that now Slayer gets good reviews, because there was a time when no one wrote nice things about the band.

TA: Yeah. That was when we were first starting off as a band and we were doing Show No Mercy songs - before we even recorded Show No Mercy. Then when the album came out, we got a really bad review on it. I read the review, and I wasn't too thrilled about it. I didn't like it. So, from that moment on, you

start taking that stuff - criticism - with a grain of salt. From that day on, after reading that first review, I thought: "Fuck those guys. They don't understand what we're doing." Then we just kept on doing what we do. We didn't look for anything. Things just happened to find us. Then we were fortunate enough to even notice the opportunities that were in front of us and took advantage of those opportunities. Thirty years later we've got 10 albums. We've been touring the world since '85. We just did it, and let lady fortune guide us whenever she showed up.

had has at least gone Gold [sales of 500,000]. When we sell tickets for tours, we can pretty much guarantee how many people we'll have as a total number in audience.

AC: Slayer's playing Seasons in the Abyss on this tour. How does it sound 20 years later?

TA: It's an amazing album. I think all of our albums are amazing after all these years. Even Show No Mercy. People ask if we ever think of going back and re-recording the older stuff. No. "How 'bout remixing?" Nope. They're really great records for their time, and it's a statement of the time. Why ruin that?



AC: Still, World Painted Blood got almost universally positive reviews. That's gotta be strange on some level.

TA: Mmm. You know, like I said, I don't really pay attention to reviews anymore - since that very first review. It is awkward that people like us now when before they didn't, and the only thing different is the fact that we're 30 years into this, and 30 years into this everybody knows the name Slayer. They associate us with metal. If the music business was a popularity contest, we'd be rich. It's not. It's about the music you create and the audience you can get to buy your records [laughs].

AC: It's surprising more Slayer albums haven't gone platinum. One would assume those albums are selling in the millions, not the hundreds of thousands.

TA: Uh, no. Like I said, it's finding the audience to buy your records. Our audience is so loyal that a record company would be more than happy to release an album because they know that they'll sell a guaranteed number more than your top artists sometimes, who get paid millions and only sell 20,000 copies. There's three major record companies. We've been on all the three. Every one of them would be more than happy to do a Slayer record, and a lot of the stuff we do is like that: "Sure, we'll do that." We're fortunate for our hardcore loyal fans. Every record that we've AC: Slayer's catalog just got remastered to vinyl, The Vinyl Conflict. Let's be honest, a lot of vinyl is a pain to lug around.

wants to see it back – but the role of the cassette in metal is remarkable.

TA: Yeah, because of the tape traders. But nowadays everything is digital, and if you really want you can burn one of your old cassettes to disc. It's the same way with albums. Everything nowadays is, "Just plug it into your computer and make a CD of it.' But you're right. Cassette tapes were a big part of metal, because everyone traded tapes. A lot of bands purposely put out a tape so that it would get circulated. And everybody who liked the tape would eventually, when it came out on disc or album, buy it because they liked the tape. If you could get your tape circulated, it was guaranteed that they would buy the album when it came out. That's the scene we were part of. Our tape got out. It exposed us to this underground tape trading, people that helped expose the band. So you're right, it did play a big part in metal, but I honestly don't think it's worth the time and energy anymore.

AC: You'll be 50 next year. How much different will you be at 50 than at 20, 30, 40?

TA: Wow. Wow. I'm already way different than I was when the band first got together. The band came together, I was 20. Thirty years later, there's a lot of things I don't do [laughs]. I was smart enough to change some aspects of my life so that I can be here on the phone talking to you. Because of those changes I'm here, I'm actually alive, and I get up every morning.

AC: You had major back surgery recently. Has it been disorienting not being able to swing that hair of yours around as you've done for 30 years?

TA: Yeeeah. It's pretty weird. Yeah, I have to admit it's kind of a bum-out. It's a bumout for me because I can't do what comes naturally. So it's awkward. I make the best of the shows, but it's just awkward, because it's something that I have to think about. I have to seriously put thought and effort into: "I'm not supposed to headbang. I'm not supposed to headbang."

AC: Because it's been a reflex since the beginning. TA: Yeah, it has. In fact, when we did the

> mance after my surgery - we did two songs for the show, and then three for the Internet after the show was over. We went into "War Ensemble" and I went into headbanging. 

GRINDERMAN Grinderman 2 (Anti-)

Free jazz indie rock? John Zorn might approve. Shards of corrosive woodshedding imbedded at every angle, Grinderman 2 sequels the lashing 2007 debut by Nick Cave's Bad Seeds satellite quartet beginning with the Jesus Lizard vamp and release of "Mickey Mouse and the Goodbye Man." Profane pole rider "Worm Tamer" pulses industrial asthma next, its rhythmic shellacking acting as meat hook. "Heathen Child" blows a tweeter third. Welcome to the deconstruction. Seven-minute centerpiece "When My Baby Comes" spews acid rain atmospherics, while "What I Know" drips waste treatment. Not all the bile separates from the bilge ("Kitchenette"), but just as Cave's crew starts to wane, 2:57 of clamorous "Evil" begins a chant echoing later throughout "Palaces of Montezuma," which excretes an unassuming jewel. "Bellringer Blues" closes like one of George Harrison's Bangladeshi mind warps.

BUKE & GASS Riposte (Brassland)

At times on their debut, Riposte, Brooklyn duo Arone Dyer and Aron Sanchez duel like early bluesmen. At others,



they strip down their folk to downstrokes that blister and neck-snapping tempo changes. Such are the experimental results of this instrumental hybrid: Dyer plays the buke, a six-string baritone ukulele, and Sanchez the gass, a guitar/bass, both incorporating ankle bells, bass drums, and a "toe-bourine." This innovation gives opener "Medulla Oblongata" a slightly haunted feel, Dyer's vocals keening sweet and high, narrating backwoods spirituals with fervor. Despite a dark facade, Riposte has a soft pop center, even if the two instruments often get lost in culs-de-sac and Dyer's voice becomes overwhelming as its own instrument over 14 songs. Cut four or five tracks, and you've got something singular. (Buke & Gass opens for Bowerbirds and Efterklang at Mohawk, Friday, Sept. 24.) *** - Audra Schroeder

RAUL MALO Sinners & Saints (Fantasy) Few things drive

women into hubbahubba mode as quickly as news of a Raul Malo

album. The Miami native

of Cuban heritage and longtime Nashville dweller carries a near-legendary singing voice that poured wild dark honey over the Mavericks' country rock throughout the 1990s and in recent years has erased genre lines. Sinners & Saints finds Malo in fine company with a distinctive Texas twang courtesy of Augie Meyers, Shawn Sahm, the Trishas, and Michael Guerra. The jefe's always-solid grasp of Americana is strengthened here on the title track with flamenco flair and cut with a gorgeous South Texas edge ("San Antonio Baby," "Superstar"). Yet, Malo's calling card is the voice, so yearning on the reverb-laden "Sombras," so alluring on Los Lobos' "Saint Behind the Glass," so exquisitely confessional on Rodney Crowell's "'Til I Gain Control Again." Only Malo can put four shades of color on the word "always." Here's hoping he continues sinning. (Raul Malo lassos Antone's Wednesday, Sept. 29.)

MICHAEL **FRANTI & SPEARHEAD** The Sound of Sunshine (Capitol)

Michael Franti the political activist is dead. The Sound of

Sunshine, the bulk of which the Bay Area singer and MC wrote while recovering from a burst appendix, follows in the manner of last summer's top of the pops, "Say Hey (I Love You)." Expressing the simplest emotions through a sprightly mix of reggae and rock, Franti works the laid-back buzz of Jack Johnson, dosing it with just enough Lenny Kravitz to make it palatable. Facing his maker, he addresses the joys of life in a way that barely skirts cliché yet is bolstered by insistent beats aimed at the body

so that the mind must follow. Highlights veer from the shimmering "I'll Be Waiting" and frantic "The Thing That Helps Me Get Through" to the pensive "Gloria." Summer's gone, but the buoyant vibe to The Sound of Sunshine extends year-round. (Michael Franti & Spearhead pierce Stubb's Wednesday, Sept. 29.) - Jim Caligiuri ***

THE BLACK **CROWES** Croweology (Silver Arrow) Relaunching the Black

Crowes brand with 2008 tomahawk Warpaint

and the mature winter blues of follow-up Before the Frost/Until the Freeze here earns the Robinson boys a victory lap. Double-disc mini gatefold and pop-up card self-songbook, Croweology opens atop a stripped but thick take of "Jealous Again," in which accentuating piano and feminine harmonies match the rumble at which acoustic and electric guitars treble the same frequency as percussion. A hand-clap drive shaft on "Share the Ride" also cruises on unleaded. That's when "Remedy" misses its amp stacks and "Hotel Illness" catches a head cold. Amorica mates "Ballad in Urgency" and "Wiser Time" remain back-to-back, but almost double their original run times, with "Thorn in My Pride" falling prey to similar endlessness. "Girl From a Pawnshop," from 1996's Three Snake and One Charm, stretches its rich acoustics, fiddle, and mandolin without the homogenization of sound and arrangement that semiacoustic endeavors such as this court, matched only by second disc farewell, "Bad Luck Blue Eyes Goodbye." (The Black Crowes' hiatus tour lands Saturday, Sept. 25, at Stubb's.) ** – Raoul Hernandez

TORCHE Songs for Singles (Hydra Head)

Torche has slowly turned a corner. Beginning on 2005's self-titled bow, the Miami metalheads improved upon the sludge breakdown of their predecessors (like singer/guitarist Steve Brooks' semilegendary 1990s band Floor), with most songs hinging on the start-stop-annihilate

formula. Meanderthal three years later found them ramping up tempos and experimenting with more anthemic structures. Now, recorded as a trio in the aftermath of guitarist Juan Montova's



exit, the eight-track Songs for Singles makes a case for the power of three. Opener "U.F.O." head-bangs into "Lay Low," half-octopus drummer Rick Smith never missing a fill, and on "Arrowhead," Brooks almost sounds like he's channeling Jane's Addiction via Guided by Voices. "Face the Wall" slows the proceedings, but with the exception of it and closer "Out Again," songs never get beyond three minutes. Epic has been replaced by efficiency. (Torche makes a left at Red 7 Friday, Sept. 24.) *** Audra Schroeder

BRIAN WILSON Reimagines Gershwin (Disney)

From its jazz-style cover depicting piano keys levitating and scattering into colorful bars, you might think



Brian Wilson's homage to George Gershwin explores new musical frontiers. While this 14-song collection demonstrates how the composer's evocative work fed the foundation of the Beach Boys' Southern California soundscape, it doesn't reimagine them as advertised. Instead. "Rhapsody in Blue" is arranged as a thematic variation of "Our Prayer" from Smile. Likewise, "Someone To Watch Over Me" is a stand-in for Pet Sounds' "Caroline, No." Knowing that "Summertime" has been singularly rendered by artists as disparate as Ella Fitzgerald and the Residents makes this version sound comparatively rote. The two previously unpublished Gershwin songs that Wilson "completes" here fall into the same conservative mold. Hearing Gershwin done in the style of Wilson's groundbreaking works is pleasant enough, but the middle-of-the-road veneer of this prestige project is the stuff of PBS pledge gifts. **

Tripper + Springer (Leaf) **EFTERKLANG** Parades + Under Giant Trees (Leaf)

This year's exquisite Magic Chairs (4AD) served as a stateside introduction for the grand orchestral vision of Danish post-rock quartet Efterklang, whose moniker translates roughly to "after-noise" or "remembrance." Leaf's reissue campaign illustrates the band's long path to get here. Released in 2003 on the band's Rumraket label and limited to 500 copies, the five-song Springer EP opens

in a post-Kid A realm of fractured electronic pulses and icy minimalism that, with the tranquil pop of "Redrop" and subtle rising of guitars in "Bright," only hints at the majesty to follow. The blueprint blossoms on the following year's lauded Tripper LP, a static symphony of chimes and vibes that recalls the glacial grandeur of Sigur Rós with three laundry lists of contributors, including members of Iceland's Amina string quartet. Efterklang develops its choir into a signature element here, with "Prey & Predator" and "Swarming" suggesting the Postal Service as remixed by the XX, a dramatic romance of male/female vocals

amplified to the level of the Danish National Chamber Orchestra. Produced over a laborious twoyear period, the group's "intricate puzzles" on 2007's Parades sound even bigger, with a newfound urgency and ceremonial bombast swelling behind more austere string arrangements ("Horseback Tenors") and militant percussion ("Maison de Réflexion"). Accompanying holdover Under Giant Trees lacks much in the way of bonus material, aside from two live recordings, but the minialbum fills in a few essential missing pieces. (Efterklang loads into Mohawk on Friday, Sept. 24.) (Both) *** - Austin Powell



Michael Peterson was convicted in 2003 of murdering his wife, Kathleen, and sentenced to life in prison in North Carolina, but T. Lawrence Pollard, who was one of Peterson's lawyers, has relentlessly offered the alternative theory (though not during Peterson's trial) that Mrs. Peterson was instead killed by a rogue owl one night in her home. Earlier this year, Raleigh's *News & Observer* wrote a series on deficiencies in the state's original investigation (though not about owls), and Pollard filed affidavits in August – one by an owl expert which explained that Mrs. Peterson's injuries were consistent with an attack by "a large bird of prey" and the other by scientists who offered to DNA-test what investigators say might be a faint microscopic "feather" from the crime scene.

LEAD STORY

More than a half-million children in the U.S. take anti-psychotic medicines, and (reported The New York Times this month) "[e]ven the most reluctant [doctors] encounter a marketing juggernaut that has made antipsychotics the nation's top-selling class of drugs by revenue, \$14.6 billion last year, with prominent promotions aimed at treating children." In one psychiatrist's waiting room, observed the Times reporter, "children played with Legos stamped with the word Risperdal" (an antipsychotic made by Johnson & Johnson). (The company, which recently lost its patent on the drug, said it has stopped handing out the toys - which it insisted were not toys at all but advertising reminders for doctors.)

THE LITIGIOUS SOCIETY

Three self-described bisexual men filed a federal lawsuit in April against the North American Gay Amateur Athletic Alliance for disqualifying them from the Gay Softball World Series in Seattle in 2008 because they were not sufficiently gay. Teams were limited to two heterosexuals, and when the men's team won second place, questions were raised about the three until organizers took them aside and asked "intrusive" questions about their sexual attractions and desires. Ultimately, they were disqualified as being too straight. (The alliance acknowledged that it has no standards for judging gayness level but explained that as a private organization, it is not subject to federal law.)

Justine Winter, 17, who was badly injured in a car crash in Flathead County, Mont., in March 2009, filed a lawsuit in July 2010 against the pregnant driver whom she had hit and killed (along with the woman's 13-year-old son). However, the local prosecutor has already charged Winter with two counts of homicide, based on text messages she had sent her estranged boyfriend minutes before the crash. "If I won," she texted, "I would have you. And I wouldn't crash my car." Also, "That's why I'm going to wreck my car. Because all I can do is f*** up. Because I am a terrible person and I know it." Also, "Good bye ... my last words." That was then; nowadays, Winter says the woman she hit was driving negligently and that construction companies failed to maintain the roadway properly.

Craig Smallwood of Hawaii filed a federal lawsuit earlier this year against the makers of the online virtual-world game *Lineage II* for failing to warn him that he would become so addicted to playing it that he would be "unable to function independently in usual daily activities such as getting up, getting dressed, bathing or communicating with family and friends." (He claims to have spent 20,000 hours over five years playing.) In August, Judge Alan Kay declined to dismiss the lawsuit and set it for trial.

IRONIES

Between suicide, murder, assault, drunken driving, and drug use, the soldiers of the 4th Brigade, 1st Armored Division, at Fort Bliss, Texas, have been statistically in greater peril while stateside than while deployed in Iraq. "Being back [home] is what we don't do well," Lt. Col. David Wilson told *The New York Times* in July. During the last year in Iraq, the brigade lost only one soldier to combat, but in the previous year stateside, seven were killed and four people died in crimes committed by brigade personnel.

Challenging Times for Labor Unions: 1) At a rally in Washington, D.C., in July, denouncing employers who hire nonunion carpenters, many of the chanting protesters were nonunion day workers hired by the carpenters' union to make the demonstration look bigger, according to a *Wall Street Journal* report. 2) In August, Jim Callaghan, a longtime writer on the headquarters staff of the United Federation of Teachers, was fired after trying to organize his colleagues into their own union local. Callaghan said that UFT staff deserve the same protections as the teachers they represent. (A UFT spokesman said most UFT employees are already unionized.)

COMPELLING EXPLANATIONS

The Republican candidate for governor of Colorado, Dan Maes, explained in August that he began the campaign supporting "green" programs, such as Denver's innovative "bikesharing" project, but that he has rethought his position. Now, he told reporters, environmental programs are, in reality, plots. "[I]f you do your homework and research, you realize [the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives, which encourages people to ride bikes in the city] is part of a greater strategy to rein in American cities under a United Nations treaty."

The New South Wales, Australia, anti-corruption commission, at a hearing in August, got engineer Don Gamage to admit that he "exaggerated" his credentials to get a series of government contracts. Nonetheless, Gamage was defiant: "If I didn't exaggerate," he explained, "the people of NSW ... would have missed [out on] the service and the benefit that I delivered."

Bruce Tuck, who confessed in December to a series of rapes in Martin, Tenn., and was sentenced to 60 years in prison (and who faces still more charges), tried to withdraw his confession in June, complaining that he was not of sound mind at the time because, though weighing 275 pounds, he was being held in jail on a "lettuce-only" diet. Thus, he said, he was unusually vulnerable when a detective offered him a bag of chips to admit to the charges.

Pine Creek Country Inn outside of Nacogdoches creates a European-style retreat among the towering pine trees of East Texas. The compound of buildings on the side of the hill overlooking a

small creek offers fellowship or privacy, depending on your wishes. "We host a lot of

family reunions, but we also have three honeymoon cottages that are nice and private." says Lisa Carter-Loubat. She and her husband, Jean Loubat, have owned the inn for more than 20 vears.

With eight buildings and two ponds on the property, most of the 18 rooms are motelstyle in two single-story lodges. The oldest of the lodges was built by the previous owner and added on to as busi-

ness improved. The Loubats built the second lodge in a more traditional style, but both have comfortable rooms and big, covered porches.

For large groups, one of the main attractions is the common building. This is a space built for a party. A big-screen TV anchors one end of the hall and a small kitchen fills the other end. And, of course, it has a big, covered porch with rocking chairs.

None of the rooms, including the common room, have cooking facilities. Why would you want to cook when you have the treat of sitting at chef Jean Loubat's table just a few steps away from your bedroom? Trained in Paris, lean cooks for Creekside Cafe in the main building of the inn, making Pine Creek a culinary gem in the woods. The menu mixes Old World with New World. You have a choice between French onion soup and tortilla soup, chicken-fried steak and beef bourguignonne all served in a dining room with a view of the forest and an attentive waitstaff. The rib-eye special is a favorite of locals looking for a Thursday night outing. The dining room is BYOB, so don't forget vour favorite beverages.

"Between us, Jean and I have more than 30 years of experience in the hotel and restaurant business," Lisa said. After working around the country, they decided to look for a place of their own. "This was the only place we found with the right potential and the location. We're a quick getaway for folks from Austin. Dallas, or Houston," she says.

If you come looking for activities, Pine Creek can keep you busy. There is volleyball, a swimming pool, and an old-fashioned tire swing. The ponds offer catch-and-release fishing. Some of the rooms have private hot tubs, while the lodges share a large, community hot tub. And there are plenty of rocking chairs.

Pine Creek Country Inn is about 15 minutes south of Nacogdoches and 18 minutes north of Lufkin. The parks on Lake Nacogdoches are about 10 minutes away. The scenic Stephen F. Austin Experimental Forest Interpretive Trail is five minutes away. For information, call 936/560-1675 or go to www.pinecreeklodge.com.

Sunday: The Texans' star keeps rising as the Cowboys' continues to fade. Houston's thrilling come-from-behind 30-27 overtime win at Washington may be the biggest in team history. Houston's big names (Andre Johnson, Matt Schaub, Mario Williams) have all performed up to their amazing abilities, while the Cowboys have struggled runnign the ball, protecting leads, and making clutch field goals having generally performed dreadfully in their first two games. Houston is not the team the 0-2 Cowboys want to face in this must-win matchup. There's a lot more wrong with the Cowboys than there is right, and if they fall this Sunday in Houston (noon on Fox, 104.9FM), as is predicted, it's gonna be a long and painful campaign for them.

The Austin Aztex have their final regular season home game of the 2010 season this weekend, hosting AC St. Louis Saturday, Sept. 25, at 7:30pm. So if you've been meaning to catch a game, there is, literally, no time like the present. And consider it a warm-up for the playoff opener in two weeks (see below). Festivities start at 6pm down the block at the **Tavern**, with fans parading to the stadium at 7pm. Wear red. Be loud... The Aztex had a disappointing two-game road trip last week, giving up stoppage-time goals both times, for a 1-1 draw at Tampa Bay and a 2-1 loss in St. Louis - each time losing the opportunity to retake first place in the league. Still, they have their fate in their own hands – a point behind the Rochester Rhinos but with three games to play, while the Rhinos only play twice... Eddie Johnson, who scored against St. Louis, is one goal behind Portland's Ryan Pore for the league scoring lead. Maxwell Griffin is in third place and Jamie Watson is tied for fourth on the league points list... With just two weekends left in the season, the playoff picture is finally starting to shape up. The Aztex will almost certainly finish first or second in the USL conference, which will be a first or third seed in the eight-team playoffs (NASL conference leader Vancouver will be seeded second). At the other end of the draw, it looks like the bottom three seeds will be Puerto Rico, Montreal, and Minnesota, in some order, so the Aztex will face one of those three - on the road, Wednesday, Oct. 6, and here, for the Aztex's first-ever home playoff game, Saturday, Oct. 9, 7:30pm.

The **UT Longhorns** got their best win in years on a rainy Monday night – beating 10th-ranked Brigham Young University, 1-0, on a goal less than two minutes into the game by **Leah Fortune**, from a long diagonal cross from **Sophie Campise**. Next up: the Big 12 openers this weekend at Nebraska and Colorado (who just upset UCLA). And here's a deal: call 232-3865 to order a **bundle pack** for the next home game (*Friday, Oct. 1, 7pm,* against UW-Milwaukee) and for \$5 you'll get a game ticket and a Texas Athletics T-shirt.

Go figure. The **St. Edward's women** (5-0-1) dropped from No. 6 in the country to No. 11, based on a 1-1 draw Friday against previously fourth-ranked West Texas A&M. The **Hilltopper men**, meanwhile, split a pair, staying unbeaten in the Heartland Conference but falling big, 6-1, to second-ranked Midwestern State. Two big conference games this week: St. Mary's, *Friday, Sept. 24, 4pm* and Texas A&M-International, *Sunday, Sept. 26, 1pm*.

From 18th century poet Thomas Gray comes the line, "Where ignorance is bliss, 'tis folly to be wise." I've always had a love/ hate relationship with this adage: Even if it's better not to

know, the idea that I could know that I didn't know and be all right with that is ... maddening. And yet we as humans frequently choose our own blind spots. We deceive ourselves all the time so our worldviews and actions are just and correct. When the brother of the titular character of *The Imaginary Invalid* says, "We must remain calm, quiet, and ignorant," he really wants his brother to give up one form of ignorance for another.

Playwright Molière digs into this ignorance in *Invalid* with a healthy dose of satire, absurdity, and wit. The play tells the tale of Argan, a wealthy man who has constructed himself an unquestioned throne for leading his ludicrous household and who suffers from all sorts of delusional diseases – in the Mary Moody Northen Theatre production, he putters around in a motorized wheelchair, always wears an electric protective helmet, and fills himself with enough colonic cocktails that his bowel system rocks his massive toilet multiple times throughout the day.

Just what ails Argan, exactly, is unknown to all but his devious physician. But Argan chooses to release the need for medical knowledge in order to gain the ignorance of safety in his doctor's hands. His need to have the rule of his roost also leads Argan to gloss over some pertinent details in his own home: that his wife is a gold digger who's faking her Russian royalty; that the man his daughter is in love with is gallivanting about right under his nose disguised as a music teacher. Molière loves to dig into his characters, who are painted with the broad strokes of absurd desire, blinded to obliviousness by what they think they crave. Director David Long has a talent of evoking sensation without dipping into spectacle. This production of *Invalid* is decidedly blue – Dr. Defacato swings an enema around like a dominatrix cracking her whip, and there's some invigorated tongue wrestling and removal of garments by young lovers – but it's no more lascivious than the world Molière intended. Argan's second-act pronouncement of "This is getting out of hand. I hate all of you." indicates how wickedly absurd the play gets.

As is the standard at the MMNT, several Equity actors lead the St. Edward's University student cast, and the veterans really shine in this production. Richard Robichaux plays the titular role as a wondrously depraved straight man, scornful of anyone challenging him and totally bamboozled by those deceiving him. Jill Blackwood is similarly delightful as the deceitful wife, Nastya, and it's always a pleasure to see *Chronicle* Arts Editor Robert Faires grace the stage.

This production of *The Imaginary Invalid* is a tight two hours of irreverent, blue humor. David Chambers' modern adaptation feels fresh, as does the modern Texas setting. Sometimes ignorance is a choice. Sometimes we hope it's a choice. One thing you won't want to be ignorant of, though, is the uproarious, entertaining production of *The Imaginary Invalid* at St. Ed's. – *Avimaan Syam*



Hamlet

William Shakespeare's best-known play probably requires no introduction, but introduce it I will. Its story of a young prince who constantly outthinks himself probably contains more famous lines ("Something is rotten in the state of Denmark,"

"Neither a borrower nor a lender be," "The rest is silence," etc.) than any other play in existence. It probably contains the most well-known piece of writing ("To be or not to be") outside of "In the beginning" It probably is not just Shakespeare's bestknown play but the best-known play of any writer, anytime, anywhere, and probably the best-known piece of literature outside of that most ubiquitous of all books, the Bible.

Which means that any production of *Hamlet* comes with a load of baggage big enough to fill Austin-Bergstrom International Airport. Anyone who sees it probably knows it, and anyone who knows it undoubtedly has preconceptions about it, which means anyone who takes it on should take a bow just for setting off on the journey. Difficult enough to do a play that no one knows; much more difficult to do a play that *everyone* knows. So a tip of the hat to the Scottish Rite Theatre for producing this paragon of literature.

The production, directed by Andrew Matthews, begins auspiciously enough, thanks to the use of Scottish Rite's beautifully painted castle drops, a single flashlight, and some sonorous, spooky sounds, also provided by Matthews. The beginning of the production stunned me, and then the actors proceeded to run through the first scene so quickly I wondered if anyone in the audience, even those who knew the play, could possibly understand what was going on.

And that was basically the theme of the evening: Speak *really fast*. The production, which Matthews has cut judiciously, runs three full hours, but it should have run three hours and at least 15 minutes, the extra time being taken up with the actors making more sense of the text they deliver so hurriedly, as well as with taking time where necessary for the audience to actually absorb what they're seeing. Almost never did those two things happen, but when they did - for example, in the famous "closet" scene between Hamlet and his mother. Gertrude - the production worked. There were more than a few things about the production that worked, including Matthews' rich sound design (which could have been used to even greater effect), Cherie Weed's costumes (which, though probably done on a shoestring budget, were helpful in setting the scenes and embodying the characters), and especially Babs George, who played Gertrude as both a repressed party girl and a guilt-ridden wife and mother.

But when the highlight of a production of Hamlet has little to do with the text that Shakespeare wrote (the entrance of the players, performed as inventively as any scene I've ever experienced in a Shakespeare production), something isn't right. Notably, the end of the play was moving, and Patrick Kaufmann as Laertes and Justin Scalise as the title character had more than a little to do with that, as they battle with rapier and dagger quite effectively. That battle has a visceral effect on the audience and the way they perceive what they subsequently watch, so even if you're not hitting the mark vocally, if you hit it physically, it will have an effect. Which only goes to show: That Shakespeare guy, he really knew what he was doing. - Barry Pineo

The work of a quintet of artists making marks on paper, making marks *with* paper, currently fills the halls of Gallery Shoal Creek. Five artists like the dissimilar fingers of a hand that

holds the key to creation within a world that river-raised papyrus spawned long ago.

Melissa Jay Craig's array of bookish objects that double as bright fungi, constructed from kozo fibers and colored as fancifully as fairy-tale toadstools, sprouts from the venue's vestibule walls, a threedimensional, mycological greeting to this current exhibition. Leonard Lehrer spent many years creating the paintings, watercolors, and lithographs that he now dissects and repurposes, via digital technology, into complexly overlapping collages – represented here by a series of "Gardens" whose polychrome aquatic and piscine elements suggest a Japanese woodcut feel. Karen Kunc's prints are made from literal woodcuts, with pigments applied so meticulously to the blocks she's bladed to abstract shapes and patterns that the resultant images jar the eye with distinct and fully saturated colors.

Francesca Samsel works in an intaglio process called viscosity etching, creating prints that juxtapose textures and portions of natural objects and machinery, as if providing the catalog for two opposing styles of *wunderkammer* or attempting to prove through sheer graphic beauty that God is in the details. Catherine Dudley creates mixed-media collages, but the media she's mixing with were also created by her: Screenprints based on the vernacular of urban signage and architectural patterns are chopped and cropped, estranged and arranged on backgrounds of paper further embellished by handpainting and precise drawing.





Wall Street: Money Never Sleeps

D: Oliver Stone; with Shia LaBeouf, Michael Douglas, Carey Mulligan, Josh Brolin, Frank Langella, Susan Sarandon, Eli Wallach. (PG-13, 133 min.)

In the very first scene, this sequel to 1987's decade-defining Wall Street winks at the now-datedness of what came before. As the once-silky antihero and convicted insider trader Gordon Gekko (Douglas) departs from jail, he's handed back what he

came into the clink with: a pocket diorama of the Eighties by way of money clip, pinkie ring, and mobile phone the size of a brick. Gekko's been out of the game a long time, and he feigns like he doesn't want back in, not really. He's written a book called Is Greed Good?, tweaking the catchphrase that set the mouths of probably tens of thousands of future stockbrokers salivating. Of course, those hungry babes grew into the collective wrecking ball of the American financial system, circa right now. Stone, with his writers Allan Loeb and Stephen Schiff, are smart to bring this sequel as near as possible to the immediate moment, and 2008's market crash steers the course of the film. Still, is America really clamoring for this? Is now really a good time to call on affection for Gordon Gekko? Perhaps anticipating the general public's general disgust for all things Wall Street, the screenwriters have made the lead of Money Never Sleeps a young Turk with a conscience. Yes, Jacob (LaBeouf) wants to make big bucks, but mostly so he can help fund green energy research, to gain the approval of his liberal blogger girlfriend, Winnie (Mulligan), who is also the estranged daughter of Gekko. LaBeouf plays Jacob as no naif - he can be as slippery and savage as the next suit - but there's also real tenderness in his scenes with Mulligan and Langella (in a small but significant role as Jacob's mentor). A lot of young actors might have interpreted the part as beginning and ending with a big swinging dick - isn't that, as much as money, what got those baby brokers going? - but LaBeouf isn't afraid to leak a few tears along the warpath. And make no mistake: This is war, all right, although it's not entirely clear if Stone wants us rooting for any side to

> win. Never a subtle filmmaker, he razzmatazzes Money Never Sleeps with graphics and camera effects that first dip, then finally face-splat into corniness. It's unnecessary noise in a movie that's already an enlivening and rather wickedly

entertaining take on the occasional angels - but mostly demons - that ran the country into financial ruin. But the film is muddy-minded about who falls into which camp. "Greed got greedier," Gekko explains to a rapt audience of young go-getters. What a curious beast this kiddle flick is, with its two wolf packs turf-warring over a prime feeding ground for caribou but played out with an almost comical bloodlessness. Wolf cubs Kate (voiced by Panettiere) and Humphrey (voiced by Long) - she the tart alpha, he the court-jester omega - talk big about how delicious caribou tartare would taste, but snack onscreen only on blueberries and cupcakes and the occasional bone licked clean of anything remotely resembling dead meat. Alpha and Omega is also something of a dirty bird: Two wolves howling at the moon is code for the mating dance. ("Was it good for you?" one wolf leers at his partner). And, yes, they do in fact dance - an embarrassing kind of disco boogie - and sing, too, with a cappella grooves that would've gone over like gangbusters on Star Search. The 3-D angle is the only one I can identify to justify Alpha and Omega not going straight to DVD, but it's a double-edged sword: While DreamWorks' team of animators produces guite painterly landscapes, the inflated ticket price exacerbates the sting of this film's dogged banality. - Kimberley Jones ★ Barton Creek Square, CM Cedar Park, Hill Country Galleria, CM Round Rock, Southpark Meadows, Highland, Gateway, Tinseltown North, Tinseltown South, Westgate

DEVIL D: John Erick Dowdle; with Chris Messina, Geoffrey Arend, Logan Marshall-Green, Bojana Novakovic, Jenny O'Hara, Bokeem Woodbine. (PG-13, 80 min.)

It's not exactly Phone Booth in an elevator with Rosemary's baby's daddy, as the trailer had genre fans believing - alas, no intricately warped Larry Cohen plotting here; more's the pity. Devil is, apparently, the opening salvo in M. Night Shyamalan's incoming The Night Chronicles series, and it would have made more of an impact if it just cut the cable and let the whole claustrophobic affair plummet into the abyss. As it is, the script (by Brian Nelson from a story by Shyamalan) spends an inordinate amount of expositional time outside the hellishly cramped confines of the 'vator as Philly Detective Bowden (Messina), a recovering alcoholic, monitors the unfolding events via closed-circuit TV and finds diabolic underpinnings in a confined situation with great potential for suspense. In short, five strangers, with unknown but assumed ties to one another, are trapped in a mysteriously immobile elevator, and, no surprise, there's something else in there with them. Fear, mounting anxiety, and a decided lack of Xanax are the rules of the game, and when the lights begin to flicker and then go out completely, bloodshed enters the squabbling fray, considerably upping the paranoiac ante. Dowdle, who helmed Quarantine, the U.S. remake of the superior Spanish film [Rec], does manage a few moments of wellcalibrated terror (kudos to the foley masters behind Devil's creepified soundscape), and Shyamalan's ongoing trickery with audience expectations is decidedly in effect (nothing is entirely coincidental in this one-way lift to doom), but it's not enough to merit a full 80 minutes. In the end, Devil feels like an ingenious short film pumped up for theatrical release. LEAVES OF GRASS

Is there anything more enticing to an actor or more fascinating for an audience than an identical-twin role? I suppose, probably, there is, but when the actor playing the dual role is Norton, the stakes are raised considerably, and when the part requires, as this one does, lightning-quick tonal and emotive switcheroos, well, that's something to savor. Part comedy, part tragedy, and wholly fascinating, Nelson's Leaves of Grass is strangely affecting and slightly off-kilter; it has enough genuine punch to overcome those seismic shifts in tone. In the end you're left wondering just how Norton, backed by an across-the-board terrific cast, pulled it off, exactly. Norton plays both Bill and Brady Kincaid. Bill is a something of a stoic rationalist, a classics professor at Brown University, the female students of which are feverish to impress him with their mastery of the Latin subjunctive, and who is also on

track for a major academic upswing. He's forcibly called away from the hallowed halls when he receives news of his brother's death (by crossbow, no less) back in Little Dixie, Okla. The brothers – and their mother (Sarandon, whip-smart as always) - have been estranged for years, and Bill regards his filial duties as a necessary chore. Once he arrives back in the sticks, however, he finds his long-haired, twangtongued brother very much alive. The perpetually stoned (but radically intelligent) Brady, who has a wife and a child on the way and a Quonset hut overflowing with high-grade hydroponic pot in the backyard, is in trouble with a Tulsa drug boss. He needs Bill to provide him with an alibi so that Brady and his hangdog pal Bolger (Nelson) can get things straight. Or as straight as they can be in the crooked and leaning world of small-town Okie drug-dealing. That's the engine that drives the plot, but it's Norton's twinned performance here that keeps the film from bogging down into some sort of casual, countrified self-parody. As Bill readjusts to the strange, slower pace of his abandoned hometown, he also begins to reconcile his past with this bizarre new present; it doesn't hurt things that he's taken a shine to local poet/ teacher Janet (Russell), who quotes Whitman and knows a thing or two about both Okie noodling and life upheavals. It sounds pat, but it's not. The script (by Nelson) mines parallel seams of black, Coen brothers-esque comedy and jolting, third-act violence. It's a jarringly realistic hybrid that echoes the more surreal aspects of real, rural life, and Norton walks/ ambles through it all, sporting dueling personalities and distinct accents, but one very serious heart. LEBANON D: Samuel Maoz; with Yoav Donat, Oshri Cohen, Michael Moshonov, Itay Tiran, Zohar Shtrauss. (R, 94 min., subtitled)

The brutally real-feeling Lebanon, which won the Golden Lion for best film at the 2009 Venice Film Festival, swings the pendulum far wide of the hyperpoeticism of Waltz With Bashir, a fellow Israeli film that examined, in flashback and with narration, the first Lebanon war in 1982. There is no editorial distance here (although writer/director Maoz has said that his own experiences in the Israel Defense Forces informed the film). Maoz sets Lebanon on the first day of the invasion and confines the action almost exclusively to the inside of an armored tank. Four soldiers sit like sardines and wait for orders: Assi (Tiran), the self-doubting commander; the mutinous artillery loader Herzel (Cohen); Yigal (Moshonov), the peace-making driver; and gunner Shmulik (Donat), a new

conscript who, up until now, has only shot at barrels. They are a combustible mix, and the actors, aided by the nimble cinematographer Giora Bejach, ably convey the griminess and gaspingness of their quarters. Upping the claustrophobia, Maoz restricts the audience's sight line to mimic the soldiers' same blind spots. What we see of the outside world - the dead bodies and bombed-out villages, soldiers taking a roadside leak, and firefights that ignite without warning - is filtered entirely through the gunner's periscope (its constant cricking and whirring is an indispensable part of the sound design). The scoped camerawork is a shrewd tactic; only occasionally does its flat, proscenium effect make the action feel overly staged. - Kimberley Jones ★★★≯ Arbor

What the military did to the memory of Pat Tillman, the football player who gave up a lucrative career in the NFL to join the Army and eventually die in Afghanistan, was wrong. The fact that Tillman was felled by friendly fire in 2004 and the military then covered up all traces of that information is a colossal betrayal of trust, if not a criminal act. The government campaign which followed attempted to valorize the memory of Tillman as a heroic figure and symbol of national pride, but it was based on specious and manipulative information, indicative of the war-planners' desperate need to invent heroes and good news at that point in the war. Tillman was awarded a Silver Star and a story was spun about his heroic conduct, sacrificing his life to spare those of his buddies. None of this was true, although what the facts actually are is still open to question. That we have learned this much about the Bush administration's culpability in the cover-up is due to the tenacity of Tillman's family, in particular his mother, Dannie, who pored over 3,000 pages of heavily redacted documents, piecing together portions of the truth. Though the story played out in the national media, this documentary makes effective use of commentary by Tillman's survivors, who resent the way the military lied to them and exploited

the memory of their loved one to serve an ulterior purpose. By extension, the nation was deceived and this movie recounts all the details. Of course, there's a certain degree to which it can be said that director Bar-Lev (My Kid Could Paint That) also exploits Pat Tillman for his own purposes of making a movie that exposes deceptions occurring at the highest levels of the military and government, (Gen, Stanley McChrystal, who recently resigned his command in light of the Rolling Stone scandal, is also implicated in the Tillman mess, along with indications that knowledge of the cover-up extended all the way to the White House.) Still, The Tillman Story is an illustrative, cautionary tale, a fact-finding mission that was ultimately stonewalled by Congress, as we witness in heartbreaking footage of the cover-up hearings. The government may choose to stick its collective fingers in its ears, but we, the people, can do otherwise. - Marjorie Baumgarten ★★★ Arbor

A WOMAN, A GUN AND A NOODLE SHOP D: Zhang Yimou; with Sun Hunglei, Xiao Shenyang, Yan Ni, Ni Dahong, Cheng Ye, Mao Mao. (R, 95 min., subtitled)

What sounds as though it ought to be delicious - this Chinese remake of Joel and Ethan Coen's debut film, Blood Simple winds up, instead, a soggy noodle. A Woman, a Gun and a Noodle Shop more or less follows the Coens' narrative construct about an adulterous wife and jealous husband who hires a private investigator to put an end to the problem, but director Zhang's version has little of the wit, surprise, or memorable characterizations of the original. Set in a remote location during some indeterminate period in the past, A Woman, a Gun is draped in colordrenched imagery that reminds us of earlier Zhang stunners such as Ju Dou and Raise the Red Lantern. But an overreliance on farce dilutes the drama without adding real hilarity and the stony expression of investigator Zhang (Sun) makes him a dull figure and merely stirs recollections of the magnificence of M. Emmet Walsh's sweaty performance as Blood Simple's Pl. in the role of his career. A Woman, a Gun follows its course as corpses are schlepped to and fro, guns are hidden and found, money is stolen, and, curiously, no one patronizes the noodle shop. A single scene of noodle preparation is included (in a balletic sequence as outrageous as any ninja battle) when the employees must serve a meal to the soldiers who come to their outpost checking in on the sound of gunfire. Zhang's directing career is notable for the way in which it has responded to the political winds of change in Chinese society. Following his lush, early films, Zhang moved

on to more populist fare like To Live and Not One Less, which was then followed by the martial arts epics Hero and House of Flying Daggers. His success can perhaps be gauged by his selection to direct the opening ceremony of the Beijing Olympics in 2008, a dazzling spectacle that wowed the universe. Seen in this context, it is probably too early to calculate the full rationale for the misstep of A Woman, a Gun and a Noodle Shop. But check out Ju Dou and pretend you are watching a Douglas Sirk movie if you want a better example of Zhang's Western influences. But for the subtitles, you'll hardly notice the difference. - Marjorie Baumgarten ★★★ Arbor

YOU AGAIN D: Andy Fickman; with Kristen Bell, Jamie Lee Curtis, Sigourney Weaver, Odette Yustman, Victor Garber, Betty White, James Wolk, Kristin Chenoweth. (PG, 105 min.)

Bell is an appealingly tart, wheels-alwaysturning kind of actress, and someday (fingers crossed) she'll find a film role that suits her as well as her star turn as a snappy peewee private eye on TV's Veronica Mars did. We get sparks of the same Veronica spitfire here, and she has a hell of a pratfall into mud that makes one long for a director who knows how to harness her innate screwball physicality. Only sparks, though, and never enough to set off any alarms. Bell plays Marni, a former high school loser who, in adult life, has remade herself as a successful and put-together public relations exec. That reinvention is threatened. however, when she returns home to discover her big brother (Lone Star's Wolk) is about to wed her high school nemesis, Joanna (Yustman, a pretty, screechy-pitched zero). In flashback, Bell fearlessly plumbs the depths of high school degradation in full-on brace-face, and the other actors - including the underused Curtis and Weaver, as former high school nemeses similarly forced to reunite - are just as game to get physical, even if the film, so relentlessly been-there, done-that, has only half their stamina. Almost as an afterthought, You Again poses an interesting question - what if our longago bullies were just as psychically scarred by the tormenting as their tormented victims were? - but that curveball is buried under a lot of gunk: dance-offs, sing-alongs, awkward exes, and a dirty-talking White blasting through, I'm afraid, the last bits of her novelty. THE AMERICAN D: Anton Corbijn; with George Clooney, Violante Placido, Thekla Reuten, Johan Leysen, Paolo Bonacelli. (R, 105 min.)

It's billed as a dramatic thriller, but this American, more European in its thoughtful pacing, doesn't contain the kind of action most Americans are accustomed to in their thrillers. Corbijn (Control) creates a sense of existential dread as he spins this story about our American antihero (Clooney). a character named Jack or maybe Edward, who is completing his last assignment as an assassin or maybe a custom firearm-builder. After a bloody showdown in Sweden, his handler (Leysen) instructs him to go to a small town in Italy and await his next assignment. While there, he develops an uncharacteristic emotional attachment to a prostitute named Clara (Placido). Despite its enigmatic mystery, The American seems more like a concept in search of a movie. The sequence early in the film of Jack/ Edward traveling through a long tunnel forms a sensibility that carries throughout the film: We can journey toward the light all we want, but that doesn't guarantee understanding or acceptance. Catfish is the creation of Joost and brothers Ariel and Nev Schulman, New York City filmmakers and dance photographers. The film begins when Nev is contacted through Facebook and thereafter receives a painting by 8-year-old Abby Pierce based on one of his published photographs. Quickly, a relationship develops between Nev and the Pierce family, and he grows infatuated with Abby's older sister, Megan. The film provides lots of material to spark passionate postscreening discussions, but, in the end, I think Catfish lives up to its namesake's reputation as a bottomfeeder. Is it just me, or is the long arm of the Internet informing all our entertainment these days? *Easy A*, like so many recent films, riffs on social media's Big Brother-like shadow; when a rumor kick-starts about the devirginizing of its heroine, high school senior

Olive (Zombieland's Stone), it spreads like a virus via text and Twitter. This is high school sexual politics in the app age, but director Will Gluck offsets his take on The Way We Live Now, Thumbs a-Go-Go Edition with overt references to the days of John Hughes-era hookups, with their quaint-seeming conundrums of class, clique, and taste. The loose inspiration here is The Scarlet Letter, that old chestnut about a passionate woman undone by her community's unthinking castigation. Easy A is a surprisingly warmhearted examination of hypocrisy and social insecurity, unlikely camaraderie and stutter-stepped formation of adult identity. And Stone is, irrefutably, a knockout as the husky-voiced incalcitrant Olive. It's a keeper. Big. Dumb. Fun. That about sums up The Expendables, which pits Stallone and his team of mercenaries against ex-CIA baddie James Munroe (Roberts) and Generalisimo Garza (Zavas), Ostensibly hired by Mr. Church (Bruce Willis) to take out the general, the Expendables - Lee Christmas (Statham), Yin Yang (Li), Gunner Jensen (Lundgren), Toll Road (Couture), Hale Caesar (Crews), and ex-Expendable Tool (Rourke) - instead find themselves on a mission of love, as Barney Ross (Stallone) has fallen for the general's daughter. But that's bullshit: The Expendables is about explosions, guns, rock & roll, motorcycles, and enough splattery testosterone to make the Pamplona bulls turn tail and run. Stallone and Dave Callaham's script doesn't set up these characters all that well, but there's an argument to be made that it really doesn't matter who these trigger-happy clowns are, that that isn't what the film is about. Enter Frank Quinn (Murray), the whiskey-snorting owner of the local funeral parlor. Played with a savy sort of gallows humor by Murray, Quinn smells a business opportunity in Bush's bizarre request to have the funeral before he dies, and the two seal the deal. And then there's the return to town of the widowed Mattie Darrow (Spacek). Duvall and Spacek give two of their finer performances here, but the film comes most to life when the deadpan Murray is onscreen. Get Low is unlike any other film I've seen this year. This could have been mindlessly please ant but for the disastrous decision to insert lots of unnecessary vulgarity - oftentimes totally tangential asides about such things as dry-humping and oral sex. Despite all this, Barrymore and ("Mac Guy") Long, as boyfriend Garrett, share some winning scenes, although Barrymore would be better off pairing with a male co-star who is fully equal to her talent. You can't discount the novelty and dazzling invention of Nolan's premise and DiCaprio's blend of unflappable cool and spittlesob emotiveness is irresistible. The parents of these two astonishingly realistic kids are middle-aged lesbian couple Nic (Bening), an ob-gyn with a type-A personality, and Jules (Moore), a sensitive, pragmatic sort currently thinking about getting into landscaping. Bening and Moore establish the sort of onscreen rapport most movie spouses strive for but rarely achieve. The Kids Are All Right isn't a melodrama about gay marriage, but rather, it's a story about the slow, inevitable grind of mar-riage – any kind of marriage – with all of its giddy peaks and melancholy, abyssal trenches. It's about the eternally unknowable curveballs life throws at you and how you either step up to the plate toward triumph or turn away in tears or terror or both. It's about love. 


Every generation gets the devil it deserves, and this faux documentary pulls few punches in its nihilistic depiction of religious belief vs. religious disbelief amid the Spanish moss and ramshackle, moldering manses of southern Louisiana. The Last Exorcism is a creep-out of the first order. Fabian plays the Rev. Cotton Marcus, a formerly crooked preacher man who has gone legit. Now hoping to expose the tricks of his fraudulent trade, Marcus travels to the farmstead of Louis Sweetzer (Herthum), a taciturn drunk who claims his daughter, Nell (Bell), is possessed. Marcus brings the camera crew along with him, and it all goes to hell, of course. The cast, in particular Bell (whose performance is un-CGI-aided and all the more disconcerting for it), is uniformly excellent and believable as "documentary" subjects, and Stamm's sense of what to reveal (or not) is as cunning as, well, the devil. Partying ensues, and so does chasing and pummeling. Kevin even begins to dis-trust his best pal, Benny (Jackson), and longtime friend Stacie (Naughton), the girl who everyone but Kevin knows is right for him. Ice Cube steps out of his usual light comedy zone to play a hermitlike old geezer with a powerful right hook. Despite lots of solid laughs and a wealth of ensemble players, first-time director White's film doesn't sustain a steady pace of jokes. 

Machete is a movie that has been a long time coming, which gives this "Mexploitation" film an extra kick now that its arrival coincides with an American political climate that enhances its topicality. The plot kicks off when Machete (Trejo) is double-crossed in Mexico and witnesses the gruesome murder of his wife and daughter by drug kingpin Torrez (Seagal). Three years later we pick up his trail as a day laborer in Texas, where a rabid anti-immigration movement is in full flourish, seen primarily in the personages of a shoot-to-kill vigilante (Johnson) and De Niro's Senator McLaughlin, a racist who advocates for an electrified border fence. The film's ultraviolence is leavened by its humorous and creative edge. Yes, Machete is gratuitous and over-the-top, but the film's self-awareness keeps it from going over to the dark side. This biopic about Li Cunxin, a Chinese ballet dancer who defected to the U.S. in 1981, is painless melodrama from its first image to the freeze-frame finale. Oscarwinning Aussie director Beresford is an old pro at this sort of thing, and Mao's Last Dancer is a mostly groan-free affair. Lithe real-life dancer Chi is well cast as Li, who came to the Houston Ballet as part of Chairman Mao's cultural exchange program, fell in love with a fellow dancer (Schull), and decided that the cultural revolution back home wasn't all it was cracked up to be. Based on Li's autobiography, the end is never in doubt, although Beresford wrings the utmost suspense from a sequence in which associates of the Chinese consulate attempt to kidnap Li in an effort

As the members of the Green family struggle to keep up their farm while their father and husband is off in battle, the bedraggled wife and mom (Gyllenhaal) receives an unexpected assist from Nanny McPhee. With her black, floor-length garb; snaggletooth; facial moles; and bulbous nose, Nanny McPhee brings order and cooperation to the household with a tap of her walking stick. The film's humor is designed to work for both kids and adults, and even if the film seems a little old-fashioned in its familyentertainment goals, there are plenty of modern-day poop jokes on the farm. Nevertheless, for American children, Nanny McPhee Returns may seem something like a foreign film, but the movie has enough spoonfuls of sugar to make the Britishisms go down. Resident Evil is 21st century popcorn fun, perfect for rainy Saturday afternoons but not much else. It's not, but supporting actors Goldblum and Lewis are just casually weird enough to stave off cinematic crib death. Aniston and Bateman are Kassie and Wally. They are, you know, made for each other. Wally's hip to this fact, but Kassie placed him in the "friendship zone" long ago. That doesn't change even when Kassie, at 40, decides to become artificially inseminated with Roland's (Wilson) donor sperm. This version is said to include 10 extra minutes, and the event includes on-set footage from the making of the film and interviews with director Friedkin, writer William Peter Blatty, and Linda Blair. @Barton Creek Square, Thursday (9/30), 7pm; @Tinseltown North, Thursday, (9/30), 7, 10:30pm. facts in Charlestown, but Doug MacRay (Affleck) is trying to leave both behind, opting instead to knock over banks. Spoofing the teen vamps vs. werewolves Twilight series and its exsanguinary fanbase sounds like an exercise in redundancy, and, as this humorless offering from the filmmakers who brought us Meet the Spartans proves, it, like, totally is. Proske plays Becca Crane, who, after moving to Sporks, Wash. finds herself torn between pale vamp Edward Sullen (Lanter) and wolfdude Jacob White (Riggi). The best thing about Vampires Suck, and I use the term guardedly, is Proske's dead-on lampooning of Kristen Stewart's self-seriousness in the Twilight films. The same can't be said of the extremely loose collection of repetitive sight gags, god-awful puns, and soul-crushingly lame kinda/sorta impersonations of everyone from the Black Eyed Peas to American Idol. Matt is a sensitive, abstemious kid, and he's had legitimate pain (a dead mom and a deadbeat dad). Instead of bringing his crude, indulgent friends up to his level, co-writer/directors Botko and Gurland want to dropkick Matt down to the subbasement and depravity of his lessers. These privileged white kids stalk New Orleans as if they own the place, hateful and destructive. Significantly, the group depicted here is of the first generation raised by the Internet, but *The Virginity Hit* doesn't have anything anthropologically interesting to say about that. The publicity department has gone to some pains to suggest the film is based on real life. I couldn't care less either way – fact or fiction, *The Virginity Hit* is repugnant. Winnebago Man is one of the best films you're going to see all year. Though its structure and object of attention are routine choices, the places the film takes the viewer and its subject - Jack Rebney, the so-called Winnebago Man - are unexpected and surprisingly satisfying. Rebney derived his underground notoriety from the hilarious outtakes of him cursing his way through a Winnebago industrial video, which YouTube turned into a viral pandemic. Still, no one knew where he was until Steinbauer tracked him to California, where Rebney lived as a hermit with no idea that he was the star of one of the most-watched videos in the world. When Austin-based Steinbauer's film premiered at the South by Southwest Film Festival '09 with Rebney in attendance, there was no doubt that the "angriest man in the world" found pleasure in bringing pleasure to others. "Never ask for what ought to be offered," 17-yearold Ree Dolly (Lawrence) admonishes her younger brother and sister. Despite their hunger and destitution, the Dolly clan will know the difference between right and wrong and learn the codes of behavior that govern the isolated social milieu in these Ozark Mountain backwoods of Missouri. It's an almost hermetically sealed environment ruled by its own moral laws and customs, traditions that have been further skewed by years of poverty, rampant methamphetamine abuse, and the callous concern of outsiders. Dolly carries the weight of her family on her young shoulders. "Never ask for what ought to be offered" could also sum up my feelings about Granik's film, a work so finely wrought that it makes other movies appear wanting. With piercing characterizations and as tense and harrowing a plot as I've seen in a long time, Winter's Bone never hits a false note. (06/25/2010) - Mariorie Baumgarten **** Arbor



Jimmy Webb needed no prodding on the topic of his upcoming show at the Cactus.

"I'd heard it was closing and was sick to my stomach," he groaned by phone. "The Cactus Cafe is a unique American thing in a university setting.

It's priceless; a jewel. Where else is a facility like that actually incorporated into the university? Nowhere!"

While the venue's changing management rather than closing, those words of support from Webb still mean something. He's a composer for whom the phrase "American music legend" is no exaggeration. His songs - "By the Time I Get to Phoenix," "MacArthur Park," "Wichita Lineman," and "Galveston," to name a few - paint the landscape with evocative portraits of the common man and his complex thoughts. Moreover, his songs have been recorded by artists as diverse as Glen Campbell, Urge Overkill, and Rosemary

Clooney, quite the source of pride for the native Oklahoman who spent much of his childhood in West Texas.

Many of those songs are revisited on Webb's latest CD, Just Across the River, wherein he gives his chestnuts new flavor, inviting the likes of Lucinda Williams ("Galveston"), Jackson Browne ("P.F. Sloan"), Billy Joel ("Wichita Lineman"), Linda Ronstadt ("All I Know"), and, yes, Glen Campbell ("By the Time I Get to Phoenix") to duet.

"If I have to," he declares, "I can sleep with River being the last album I ever make. Throw the others in a junkyard, and I would be okay." - Margaret Moser

PENNY TRICK WITH BATTERY IS NO DREAM

Dear Tom and Ray:

I may be dreaming, hallucinating, or even suffering from dementia. I seem to remember something from my childhood that other people my age do not. When I was but a tadpole, I seem to remember my dad checking the water level in the car battery. The top of the battery was covered with a thick, tarlike substance, into which he would push copper pennies next to each battery terminal. The reasoning behind this was to draw the potential corrosion away from the terminal and toward the penny. Did I dream this, or did people used to do this? Please tell me if I'm demented or not. – Art

RAY: We don't have enough information to answer your last question, Art. And the fact that you're writing to us for advice definitely is a strike against you. But you're not dreaming about the pennies and the batteries.

TOM: It's based on the theory of sacrificial anodes, in which you "sacrifice" a more reactive metal - copper, in the case of pre-1983 pennies - to protect a second, less reactive metal - the lead battery terminal and connector.

RAY: And in the old days, when batteries were covered with tar on top, you could warm up a penny with a match or a cigarette lighter, and then slide it into the tar half an inch away from the battery terminal. The penny always would corrode first.

TOM: Nowadays, most batteries are sealed in plastic, so the acid - which is what causes the corrosion - rarely escapes the inside of the battery. That makes a sacrificial anode far less necessary. And besides, these days, we all have to save our pennies.






