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

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
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#### 'Chronicle' Endorsements

#### Nov. 2 general election

In the last couple of decades, Travis County voters have become accustomed to a topsy-turvy ballot on which the statewide officeholders are invariably Republican and the local incumbents are almost exclusively Democrats. For Austinites, it's an occasion for smugness or despair (or both). The ballot for 2010 is much the same: top mostly GOP red, bottom mostly Democratic blue.

Although we don't recommend a straightticket, with few exceptions we endorse Democratic candidates for state offices to start to undermine the current GOP monopoly. At the local level, the hard choices were in the Democratic primary, leaving only a few seriously contested general races - and none where we can recommend the Republican. (Note: We offer endorsements only in contested races. See the full text of these endorsements at austinchronicle.com/elections.)




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# Riding Pants

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






#### **PROP. 1'S MASS TRANSIT FAIL**

The endorsements for Proposition 1 get curiouser and curiouser. The "'Chronicle' Endorsements" [News, Oct. 22] stated that Prop. 1 will help us "get moving again in the right direction." Mayor Lee Leffingwell declared [in an ad on p.31] we "must have a viable mass transit system."

However, only one project funded by Prop. 1's \$90 million bond package involves mass transit at all. That \$2 million project is for both street widening and improved bus service on Guadalupe and Lavaca. Mass transit systems, just like highways, are expensive (though less so). We'll never have viable mass transit if we don't dedicate more than 2% of transportation investment for it.

My suggestion is to vote against Prop 1. By the time the next transit bond package comes



around, energy prices will likely have reached levels that will cause even the Chronicle, our mayor, and the Sierra Club (which also endorsed Prop. 1) to see that we really need to fund mass transit. Philip Russell

#### **'SUCCESS' DIRECTOR DESERVES MENTION**

Ever heard of the late film director Alexander Mackendrick? He made classic films like The Ladykillers and The Man in the White Suit and later ran the filmmaking program at the California Institute of the Arts. If not, check out his book On Film-making edited by Paul Cronin. Mackendrick was the rare great film craftsman that chose to leave Hollywood in order to share his knowledge with young filmmakers in an academic setting. He was as eloquent and articulate in the classroom as he had been behind the camera. In Cronin's collection of his teachings, Mackendrick clearly outlines the near-symbiotic relationship between writer and director (and between writing and directing), at least in his own work.

Oh yeah, he also made a film you seem to dearly love called Sweet Smell of Success. In your half-page essay singing the film's many praises ["That Fighting Spirit," Screens, Oct. 22], you certainly seem to know all about it - the writers, actors, cinematographer, etc. Strangely, you fail to name check "Sandy" or even mention his direction at all. Just wanted to make sure you knew that this "classic" didn't direct itself. I understand the focus on the screenwriting angle

due to the Austin Film Festival screening, but you digress from this enough to have at least mentioned the director once. And Mackendrick's close collaboration with the film's credited writers should be considered in any discussion of the film's literary merits (again, see Cronin's book).

I wonder if such an omission in an article that otherwise celebrates the film's many accomplishments would seem to Mr. Mackendrick a sensation very much like your article's title (cribbed from the film's dialogue): a cookie full of arsenic, indeed.

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
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**PRIVATIZATION NIGHTMARES** Dear Editor,

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
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#### Headlines

- City Council convenes today, Thursday, Oct. 28, to a 75-item agenda without much controversy. However, Water Treatment Plant No. 4-related road improvements and changes to womenand minority-owned business contracting may be the exceptions to the rule. See "Running the Numbers," p.28, and "City Hall Hustle," p.20.
- In the wake of his reinstatement, Austin Police Officer Leonardo Quintana on Wednesday was again fired by Chief Art Acevedo, this time in connection with a domestic disturbance case. For more, see "Quintana Reinstated ... and Reterminated," p.22.
- ➤ Capital Metro has announced a pilot plan to close four stops on Congress Avenue, starting Nov. 6. The transit agency hopes closing the northbound stops at Sixth and Seventh streets and the southbound at Seventh and Eighth will reduce the number of accidents.
- Against the homeowner's wishes, the Historic Landmark Commission on Monday recommended historic zoning status for the Bradford-Nohra house, a deteriorating Hyde Park manse on Avenue G. The neighborhood association has challenged owner Helen Nohra's plans to demolish and replace the structure, a battle that has led to mediation, court, and this recent do-over vote by the HLC; City Council may have the final say.
- On Oct. 22, the Texas Supreme Court rejected an appeal by Hyde Park Baptist Church in the 2007 lawsuit charging child abuse at its day care center. A jury found the church negligent in supervising a teacher who had "physically, verbally, and emotionally" abused a young child in her care, and the 3rd Court of Appeals had affirmed the verdict in 2009. See "When the Bough Breaks," Nov. 17, 2006.
- Austin Energy announced this week the availability of zero-interest loans and rebates that can be used on top of federal tax credits and Texas Gas Service rebates to fund home energy-efficiency improvements. The offer extends through the end of the year.
- ➤ The Solid Waste Advisory Commission last week recommended introducing citywide recycling by 2014. Currently, small multifamily complexes aren't required to provide recycling; under the proposal, recycling at all residential units and offices would be phased in starting in 2012. Phase 2, offering recycling and possibly composting to the food service industry, is still under discussion. City Council is expected to vote on the issue Nov. 4.
- The Cathedral of Junk still stands: The Save the Cathedral of Junk campaign announced on Oct. 23 that the city of Austin has granted a building permit to the South Austin icon.



A Travis County jury Wednesday found South Texas Rep. Kino Flores guilty of tampering with government records and perjury in connection with charges that he cut legislative deals in exchange for money. The Democratic lawmaker will be sentenced at a later date and could face up to two years in prison.



A late push Tuesday to get out the Democratic vote drew top-of-the-ticket candidates, like gubernatorial hopeful Bill White, to Parque Zaragosa Recreation Center in East Austin to schmooze with voters in advance of the Nov. 2 election. Early voting ends Friday. See election coverage, p.30.

#### Why Vote?

#### The real choices at the top and bottom of the ballot

My favorite moment of the campaign season thus far was a seemingly trivial one: the ritual reporter's request (this time the *Statesman*'s Corrie MacLaggan) of the gubernatorial candidates for a UT vs. OU football prediction. No, neither Gov. Rick Perry nor challenger Bill White committed political suicide by (rationally) picking the Sooners, and curiously enough they predicted the same score: a 20-13 Longhorn victory. As it turned out, the candidates were half right; UT scored 20, but Oklahoma, alas, somehow managed 28.

It seemed an innocent-enough moment in an otherwise polarized political season, except that the governor – who can't be bothered to debate his opponents or speak to newspaper editors – couldn't resist leading his prediction with the utterly gratuitous, "Texas is CNBC's top state for business – again – in 2010." Setting aside the simple rudeness of sticking a campaign bumper sticker onto a supposedly nonpartisan gesture, the governor's reflexive sloganeering sums up his entire campaign, as well as his principles of governance, in a nutshell. "What's good for 'business'" – understood as a political term of art, meaning "business owners" – "is good for Texas," by defini-

tion. If the cable TV business network thinks Texas is "good for business" – i.e., low corporate taxes, minimal public education and social programs, weak unions, restrictive labor laws, miserable wages, lack of financial or environmental regulations – then that's good enough for Perry and his party.

Indeed, it's something to celebrate.

That's a conviction sincerely held. If

Texas government stays out of the way

of owners and bosses, the logic goes,

the owners and bosses will reward us

with investment and jobs, and we can pull our forelocks accordingly and hope for little pieces of the pie. There's nothing much here for citizens or indeed even for working people – instead we all become "employees" (that's French for "the used") and wistfully hope not to be among those consigned, as necessary, to the unlucky ranks of the "unemployed." That explains not only Perry's campaign but his consistent approach to governance: Promote the business interests of big donors, CEOs and stockholders, corporations, all those folks in the "owner's box" at Lege time – and maybe prosperity will occasionally trickle down to the rest of us.



AUSTIN AZTEX ABSCOND Sad news for local soccer fans: The Austin Aztex are moving to Florida. On Oct. 25, team President Phil Rawlins announced that the local franchise has been acquired by Orlando Sports Holdings. Although the new deal has strict termination rules, Welch said that since it does not take effect until January 2011, the district "is amenable to invalidating the contract most recently executed."

- > TEN TO F1 Some good news for Austin's planned Formula One track: First, the Korea International Circuit held its first Grand Prix on Oct. 24, defying the same rumor that has swirled around the Austin site - that it would not be ready in time. Formula One United States Chair Tavo Hellmund noted that, while the Korean circuit "didn't have the luxury of having a race under their belt" before their inaugural Grand Prix, "it was still an amazing event." This comes after the Oct. 6 announcement by the BMW Sauber F1 Team that Mexican driver Sergio Perez will be joining its team in 2011. The Austin project was already predicting a minimum of 20,000 fans attending from Mexico; this signing is predicted to increase that number. With a track completion date of June 2012 and groundbreaking planned for December, the project is currently working with the city and county on planning approval and is expected to announce engineering contracts soon. Project attorney Richard Suttle has already told the Travis County Commissioners Court that the project is working on adopting rules for minority-owned and women-owned business involvement similar to those used by the city of Austin.
- **▶ BEER GEARS AND BIKE GOGGLES** For the eighth time, New Belgium Brewing is bringing its Tour de Fat to Austin, at Fiesta Gardens on Oct. 30, 9am-4pm. The Fort Collins, Colo., beermaker takes great pride in applying sustainability to its business methods and is especially supportive of bicycling – its flagship beer, Fat Tire Amber Ale, is named in honor of a bike trip its founder took through Belgium. #### **TRYING TO SHARE THE WORK**

Council tweaks MBE/WBE rules to broaden contract participation

One of the most inscrutable aspects of city contracting – and there are a lot – has to be Austin's **Minority-Owned and Women-Owned Business Enterprise Procurement Program.** Otherwise known as MBE/WBE, the program is an alphabet soup of participants (minority- and women-owned business enterprises MBE and WBE) and agencies (the city's **Small & Minority Business Resources Department**) striving to meet participation goals that, by law, can't be explicitly spelled out. (That would be the Reagan-era bugaboo of "quotas," remember?)

The idea, to give a leg-up to women and minority businesses – groups that didn't get a 180-year head start locally – is that city contracts and subcontracts should have participation goals, or failing that, the winning bidder should be able to show that a demonstrable "good faith effort" has been made to ensure MBE/WBE participation, even if that goal wasn't met.

However, the Hustle recalls many a City
Council meeting in which a major contract
was pulled from the consent agenda for
want of participation. "I've been doing that
quite a bit, you could say," laments **Shery! Cole**, who sits on the council committee for
MBE/WBE. "We simply received complaints
from a number of citizens about low participation rates and items that were not lawful under the
code. We simply needed to make that more explicit."

That's what a suite of items on the council agenda would do this week. Covering each of the four areas for which the city contracts - professional services, construction, nonprofessional services, and commodities the items perform four separate tasks. First, they require contract bidders to step up their solicitation efforts for MBE/WBE participation by using at least two means (options include newspaper ads. faxes, phone calls. social media, and more). They also look to increase participation by having contractors break subcontracting work into "economically feasible portions" that potentially smaller firms could handle, as well as utilize resources from MBE/WBE community organizations and the SMBR office. "For the past several months, we've noticed glitches in the system," Cole says of low minority participation contracts, "glitches that these changes are meant to clear up."

The second issue addressed by the changes, Cole says, is a prohibition on bid shopping, a situation in which "a general contractor goes out and makes his overall proposal and contacts a list of subcontractors, then he runs into another subcontractor" who will under-

cut the previous bid. "A deal is a deal," she says. "We eliminated that – the idea is that you cut it off at a point in time. You can be sanctioned now."

The third change addresses an issue that Cole says "comes up quite a bit in the [MBE/WBE] subcommittee": unapproved contract changes. "Some of the citizens that testify about this say a general contractor will prepare a bid proposal that says it's going to use good faith efforts ... then they will actually change that proposal, and reduce or eliminate those goals, and not notify the city or the subcontractors about that change. So you'll have representation that you're going to have 1.8 percent African-American participation, but when it's over with, you'll have none at all. This will require a request for changes" to be vetted by the SMBR office. While Cole emphasizes that "some contract changes are legiti-

mate and some are not," the often glacial pace of the contracting process ("Sometimes it takes a year or nine months to execute," she notes) means not every change can be caught or addressed. Overall, she says, the reforms are needed. "If we're gonna have these goals and require good faith, then we need to do all that we can."

The changes were vetted by both the council MBE/WBE committee and a citizen's MBE/WBE small business advisory commission.

One of the participants in that process was **Carol Hadnot**, program consultant for the **Austin Black Contractors Association**. She first caught the Hustle's attention back in April, when she spoke in opposition to a \$67 million contract to build Austin Energy's System Control Center with no minority participation goals. (The contract was postponed, then pulled from the agenda.) Hadnot sees the changes as "really just cleanup – more of a housekeeping item." She applauds the measures, saying they should succeed in "making things much clearer to the business community." However, she notes, "It's one thing to get things on paper; another thing is implementation," suggesting the ABCA, not to mention Austin's Hispanic and female contractors, will be watching closely.

Spend just a few minutes around a council agenda, and you realize it primarily consists of spending money – lots of money. Hopefully with this week's actions, we'll begin to see Austin's bounty of construction contracts spread a little more equitably across the city, thanks to spelling out the rules a little more clearly.

That there are plenty of voters who subscribe to that servile logic – what's good for my bosses is good for me – is also no big secret. They will vote accordingly. Does it mean White, by contrast, is the inveterate champion of working people? Not really, but politics is all about coalitions of interest groups, and the coalition sustaining White – teachers, wage workers, unions, minority voters – will have seats at the legislative and executive table under a White administration. Under Perry – as under business as usual for the last decade – we will have none.

That seems a sufficiently good reason to vote.

#### Drive, They Said

Closer to home, my favorite campaign moment was the curious collection of hardcore highway enthusiasts who gathered last week to oppose the city of Austin's proposed Mobility Bond, aka Proposition 1. I was on

the road and missed the press event itself, but in this space last week City Hall Hustler Wells Dunbar provided an entertaining disambiguation of the instantaneous "citizen organizations" and their overlapping memberships. What a motley crew! Under the permanent campaign banner of Carole Keeton Strayhorn and her Austinites for Action, we were treated to Don "Tea Party" Zimmerman, Jim "No

Transit, No Way" Skaggs, Dominic "Wannabe" Chavez, Ed "More Dollars for More Sprawl" Wendler, even Max "Remember Me?" Nofziger. And of course, pretending to represent the Eastside, Gavino "What's in It for Gavino?" Fernandez. Underwriting this public intoxication is none other than Mike "Millions for More Cops" Levy, who paid for last week's *Statesman* ad sternly excoriating "trolleys" and "pogo sticks," those evil avatars of a toopedestrian future. In the immortal words of Steppenwolf, "Get your motor running, head out on the highway!"

Listening to this crew, you would think the city never spends any money on roads at all. Instead, this is the first bond in years —

indeed, ever — that finally begins to reflect the hard-earned knowledge that more of the same only leads to more of the same, that city arterials cannot accept more car capacity unless we start knocking down buildings (the dreaded eminent domain!) or double-decking boulevards (now there's a vision of Austin's future), and that the cries of "MoPac!" and "I-35!" suggest we should instead hand city bond money over to TxDOT and hope for the best. That's no doubt because TxDOT has been such a careful tender of public monies, and that promoting even more sprawl and even more highway lanes is somehow exactly what we need.

The anguished howling of the road warriors rises now because for essentially the very first time, not nearly 100% of the transportation bond money would be going to subsidize motor vehicles and *only* motor vehicles. Even Ben Wear's credulous treatment of the opposition in Sunday's *Statesman*, providing

extended defense of Wendler's dubious roads-first arithmetic, acknowledges graphically that in transportation bond elections stretching back to 1992, anywhere from 87% to 100% (the average is 94%) has been devoted entirely to roads – that is, to motor vehicle traffic. According to the city, the current bond devotes 57% to road work and 43% to other forms of transporta-

tion. Might using *some* money to give *some* people a few reasonable alternatives to *always* driving actually serve to reduce roadway congestion? Inconceivable!

Despite the late-game hysterics, based on the wide range of supporting organizations and people – hundreds of whom actually engaged in the process of shaping the bond package as it happened – I would guess the bonds will be approved. But maybe not. It's a strenuous political season, and if those folks who say they want to change Austin's transportation priorities stay home, well, they'll get what they pay for: more of the same.

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#### Quintana Reinstated ... and Reterminated

Last week, Leonardo Quintana, the Austin Police Department officer who last May shot and killed Nathaniel Sanders II in an East Austin apartment complex parking lot, was given his job back, effective immediately, by an independent arbitrator. It didn't last long. On Wednesday, Chief Art Acevedo held a new disciplinary hearing with Quintana to discuss the outcome of yet another Internal Affairs investigation of the officer (concerning an alleged domestic violence incident last October) and, late Wednesday afternoon, announced that he has once again fired Quintana. Quintana's union attorney, Tom Stribling, said his client will continue to fight to keep his job.

The allegation involves Ouintana's former fiancée. fellow Officer Lori Noriega. with whom Quintana has had a rocky relationship. In 2006, he was disciplined for a confrontation with her; although he was originally given a 15-day suspension for that incident – he had gone to a house they shared to retrieve some personal property and allegedly pushed her to get into the front door – it was later downgraded to a written reprimand. Among the evidence reviewed in that situation were polygraph exam

results for both Quintana and Noriega, which suggested she had not been truthful about what happened, Stribling said.

According to the Leander Police report of the incident, officers responded to Noriega's home after someone there placed a 911 hang-up call. When the police arrived, no one answered the door: the Leander Police knew that Quintana used to live there with Noriega, so an officer called him on the phone. He told police he was at his apartment and that he'd been at the house. He said he had gotten into an argument with Noriega and she'd asked him to leave the house, which he did. On his way out, he said, she threw his jacket at him (neither apparently noticed that a loaded gun magazine had fallen from the pocket onto the driveway) - a story she later confirmed once police were finally able to get her to come outside and talk with them. Noriega told them it was only a verbal disturbance, but Stribling said that several days later she went to a doctor, complaining of concussionlike symptoms, and reported that Quintana had actually shoved her head through a piece of drywall in the home during the argument. Quintana denies the allegation, Stribling said.


This is now the second time this year that Quintana has been fired – and the second time he will appeal. When he was fired the first time, earlier this year, it was not for anything directly connected to the Sanders shooting - he had been given only a 15-day suspension for failure to activate his in-car camera. Although at least one Internal Affairs reviewer thought that Quintana's tactics lead-

ing up to the shooting were incorrect, Acevedo cleared Ouintana of violating any major department policies. Quintana's actual termination didn't happen until earlier this year, after he was arrested in January in Williamson County for drunken driving.

At his arbitration hearing regarding that incident, Acevedo and the rest of Quintana's chain of command testified that Quintana was fired for a string of bad decisions - not only for the (still pending) DWI but also for several unrelated actions, including posting a picture of himself holding a rifle with the caption "back to work" to Facebook on the day he returned from administrative leave

> after the shooting. Acevedo and Quintana's supervisors testified that they believed he had demonstrated a pattern of poor judgment worthy of dismissal.

> According to arbitrator Louise Wolitz, that conclusion simply wasn't fair. For starters, "this indefinite suspension was completely inconsistent with all the other discipline issued to officers involved in DWI incidents," she wrote. "There is no case in the record where an officer



the DWI situation Officer Quintana was involved in from any of the other DWI situations in the record," she continued, "To be appropriate, discipline must be consistent with that assessed in other similar cases for the same offense."

Moreover, she concluded, the allegation that Quintana had demonstrated a pattern of poor judgment was tenuous at best - and as for the Facebook photo dustup (Ouintana not only removed the photo immediately after he was asked to do so but also deleted his Facebook account entirely), she wrote, "It is certainly a thin reed on which to hang a diagnosis of a pattern of poor

judgment." Indeed, the "pattern" couldn't even be considered in upholding his termination, Wolitz wrote, because none of that conduct was ever listed in the disciplinary memo Acevedo provided to Quintana. "The discipline [for the DWI] was enhanced by improperly considering matters for which no discipline was issued and in which no rule or regulation was violated."

"We have no showing of a pattern of poor judgment in Officer Quintana's police work before the officer involved shooting incident," Wolitz wrote. Throughout the arbitration, the shooting death of Sanders seemed to be the 800-pound gorilla in the room – the unspoken reason that Acevedo appeared so intent on now showing Quintana the door despite his earlier decision to clear Ouintana on all potential policy violations except the failure to activate his camera.

Now, with Quintana dismissed yet again, there is at least the suspicion that Acevedo's decision is designed to punish the officer for something that has nothing to do with the incident in question. Stribling said that, as in the 2006 situation involving Noriega, there are questions about the veracity of her statements regarding the alleged domestic abuse.

At his Wednesday press conference to announce the dismissal, Acevedo insisted that is simply not true. Noriega, he said, is a victim – and it is not surprising that she hasn't always been completely frank about the precise nature of her dealings with Quintana. "What [some people] call lying, I'd call absolutely consistent behavior by this victim," Acevedo said. Moreover, he said that during an investigation of the October incident, the department learned that there was yet another physical incident during which Quintana had allegedly pinned Noriega against a wall while trying to remove an engagement ring from her finger. In total, he said, Quintana's behavior is not appropriate for a police officer. "Rest assured, this department did the right thing for the right reasons," by firing Quintana again, Acevedo said. The evidence "will show that Officer Quintana should not be a member of this police department."

#### The Case That Never Closes

Just when we thought it was safe to put this story to bed forever, the saga of Judge Sharon Keller has reared its ugly head once more. A threejudge panel early this month tossed out a public warning handed to Keller by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct. The admonition had been prompted by her refusal in 2007 to keep the Court of Criminal Appeals clerk's office open in order to accept a late filing from condemned inmate Michael Richard, who was subsequently put to death. Now SCJC Executive Director Seana Willing and the commission's special counsel John McKetta are asking that same three-judge panel to reconsider its decision. If the public warning was an inappropriate disciplinary



action, they're arguing, then the court should have sent the case back to the SCJC - so it could impose a more appropriate action - instead of tossing out the entire case. In a classic example of the pot calling the kettle black, Keller's lawyer, Chip Babcock, told several newspapers he was "disappointed" that the commission wouldn't just let go of the issue.

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

On Thursday, Oct. 28, the **Green Roof Advisory Group** heads to City Hall – home of Austin's most prominent green roof project – to report on the state of Austin's "living roofs." Also known as "sky gardens," green roofs blanket the tops of buildings with vegetation – often native plants well-adapted to the local climate – and are known to improve both buildings and their surroundings (or, in city parlance, provide both public and private benefits). Created in August 2009, the advisory group was charged with exploring the feasibility of using city policy to promote green roofs around town.

Green roofs are credited with a surprising array of advantages. They can mitigate the urban heat island effect, reduce storm water drainage (helping both to prevent flooding and

to protect downstream water quality), provide wildlife habitat, reduce the costs (and associated greenhouse-gas emissions) of cooling a building, and extend the life expectancy of a building's "roof membrane." Studies also show that they can reduce noise pollution and enhance property values. All around the world, cities have been using green roofs to tackle urban problems, says GRAG Chair Eleanor McKinney. They've been popular for decades in Stuttgart, Germany, she says, where they are mostly mandatory downtown. Among U.S. cities, Chicago has the most square footage of green roofs - the result, says McKinney, of a municipal program that provides grants, density bonuses, and staff assistance for such projects.

Here in Austin, the trend has been relatively slow to catch on. In fact, one of the adviso-

ry group's first projects was simply to take inventory of the existing green roofs in town. The official (so far) grand total, 23, includes residential properties as well as institutional and commercial developments, such as **Dell Children's Medical Center**, the **Escarpment Village** (a southwest Austin retail center), and City Hall (which has two green roofs designed by McKinney and landscape architect **Carolyn Kelley**.

GRAG also combed through city policies to identify those that either already encourage green roofs but aren't typically interpreted with that goal in mind (such as open space requirements for **planned unit developments**) or could encourage them if the language were tweaked (e.g., green roofs can somewhat function as "pervious cover" – allowing rainfall absorption – but are not currently defined as such). GRAG has documented the results of that analysis, along with recommendations for further changes (such as a suggestion that green roofs be included in the **Downtown Density Bonus Program**), in a final report to be presented at council.

GRAG also plans to request a yearlong extension to continue its work, primarily to develop locally relevant **performance standards** for green roofs. As McKinney points out, good performance standards are an integral part of the process: "Say the city does give a density bonus credit for a green roof – they want to make sure that it's viable," says McKinney. "The density bonus obviously is given before they start construction. ... They don't want someone to just say, 'Yes, I'm going to do a green roof,' but then not have ... the plants survive."

As it turns out, however, developing adequate standards is "tougher than anyone ever thought," says sustainable design consultant **Dylan Siegler**, also a GRAG member. "You need to create performance standards, some

design criteria, to say, 'Here's what a green roof is," she explains. "If you put three planter boxes on top of your high-rise, you don't get a green roof credit." But, she says: "The definition of green roofs that exists in the rest of the world is not perfectly applicable here. ... It so happens that it's been cold climates that have really grasped the green roof thing and run with it for 30 years." In Austin, the weather is "dry as hell - and then we get a deluge of rain. There are very certain plants that are adapted to work in that, and it's even more exaggerated on a roof," says Siegler. "We're going to be some of the first people to really codify this in a semiarid - or some people call us subtropical - climate."

Luckily, there is still a lot of useful wisdom to be gleaned from colder climates, say Siegler and McKinney. According to a Canadian report on green roof projects around the world, there's a six-step process involved in bringing the trend into the fold of city policy. GRAG's very existence, they say, puts Austin at step three, while a city like Stuttgart - which invested in more than 1.1 million square feet of green roofs between 1983 and 2006 - is a solid six. "If you understand where you are, you understand that it will take a while to get to stage six," says McKinney. "We just are kind of getting council interested, and so you don't have to ask for the moon, right? You can kind of just go from, this is where we are, and we're at a good place."

#### **Teachers Want Books Checked at Pension Fund**

When Democratic governor hopeful **Bill White** produced a "smoking gun memo"
alleging impropriety and bad investment practices at the state agency that handles
\$102.4 billion in teacher pension funds, it
was initially written off as campaign theatrics. Now deeper and more worrisome questions are being raised about whether mismanagement under Gov. **Rick Perry** has left
the fund with a gaping hole. And this

the fund with a gaping hole. And this week, the president of the union that represents Texas teachers called for a serious review of the allegations laid out in the memo.

The White campaign first brought attention to the **Teacher Retirement System**'s questionable practices on Oct. 19, when it released a 2009 internal memo from **Michael Green**, director of private markets in TRS' investment division, to TRS board chair **Linus Wright**. In the memo, Green alleged that Chief Investment Officer **Britt Harris** was being "manipulated by Board members and investment managers to the detriment of TRS' beneficiaries." White's campaign alleged that, while current Perry campaign finance committee chair **James Lee** served as TRS

chairman, staff was pressured to award contracts to firms owned by Perry donors.

The smoke seemed to clear briefly when the agency released a report on the matter by former Securities and Exchange Commissioner **Roel Campos**. Furthermore, the Travis County District Attorney's Office found no criminal malfeasance, so that seemed to be the end of it.



But that diagnosis wasn't exactly an allclear. In his report, Campos said there was evidence of "inadvertent" violations of the Trustee Ethics Policy and recommended revising the rules for interaction between trustees and staff. Tim Lee, executive director of the **Texas Retired Teachers Association**, added that "the management issues need to

be reviewed thoroughly."

However, even that mild criticism has only served to stir up deeper questions, like why TRS hired Campos in 2009 when Attorney General **Greg Abbott** blocked his contract as TRS ethics officer in 2008 or why Green has been on paid leave since Dec. 31, 2009. It also dredges up old questions about James Lee's reforms at TRS, like his 2008 grilling by members of the Senate Finance and State

Affairs committees over the board's decision to dump its ethics-advising fiduciary counsel in favor of a new firm with no public pension fund experience. There's the even bigger question of how the fund has gone from having enough reserves in 2000 to provide pensions to the state's 1.2 million retired teachers for 30 years to a \$21.6 billion unfunded liability in 2009.


On Oct. 25, **Linda Bridges**, president of teachers' union **Texas AFT**, called for a fresh investigation of Green's allegations. "We aren't convinced the TRS internal investigation is credible," she said. She also questioned why Perry rejected House Bill 2656, a Republican-authored bill adding one more retired teacher to the TRS board. The bill passed unanimously in both the House and



Senate in 2009, but Perry vetoed it, calling the restructuring away from his handpicked financial experts "an inappropriate adjustment in these uncertain economic times." Bridges replied, "The expertise Perry cites seems to be the ability to respond to political pressure and requests for favors."

#### The Real Cost of a Lap Dance?

Despite what some billboards around town might lead you to believe, most people do not go to strip clubs for the lunch deals. They go to watch topless women dance up on a stage or, for a little extra dough, up close and personal. Given that the main draw to the clubs is the dancing women, one might be surprised to learn that the clubs don't pay them anything. In fact, dancers pay the clubs.

Here's how the pay structure at a strip club works: The club employs managers, bartenders, and DJs, paying each a wage that falls within federal standards. On the other hand, dancers sign contracts that label them as independent contractors, their wages furnished solely by their customers in tips. In addition, each dancer must pay what's known as a "door fee," which fluctuates depending primarily on the time of her shift. On top of the door fee, each dancer is required to "tip out" a certain amount to her managers, no matter how much she has made in tips for herself. She is also expected to tip the bartender and the DJ. She doesn't like the rules of the house? Fine. Go work somewhere else. One problem: Those same rules will apply to any dancer in any club in town. It's all legal, eagle.

Enter Houston-based lawyer **Bob Debes**, who's been representing workers in the service industry for more than 20 years. On Oct. 6, he filed a collective action against the owners of two local strip clubs: **Perfect 10 Men's Club** and **Sugar's Uptown Cabaret**, seeking back pay for at least four women who have worked in those two clubs within the last three years. The suit alleges that the women are owed minimum wage for the hours they worked, as well as overtime compensation for those weeks they worked more than 40 hours.

What of that contract those women signed when they were hired – the one that's supposed to clear the clubs of any lia-

bility because the women knew they were being hired as independent contractors? "It doesn't matter if a person signs a document that classifies her as an independent contractor rather than an employee," says Debes. "It is not binding. It is the Fair Labor Standards Act, the federal wage law that applies to these situations, that determines whether a person is an independent contractor rather than an employee." That goes for strippers, baristas, waiters – Debes says that many in the service industry fall under the **Fair Labor Standards Act**'s protection.

Debes, who says he has filed – and mostly settled – similar lawsuits against local establishments such as Chuy's, the Salt Lick, and Cafe Josie, not to mention various strip clubs in the Houston and Dallas areas, seems certain that he'll win this one. "The courts have uniformly held that these women are employees, not independent contractors," he contends. That's because the dancers aren't in control of their work environment. "The club – who is their employer – sets the work conditions. The dancers are required to charge a certain amount for lap dances. They are required to dance onstage for a certain amount of time. And those are just a few examples."

Calls to the lawyer representing Sugar's and Perfect 10 went unanswered, but we were able to reach a former employee of both clubs who asked that we not use his name. "I've seen girls leave the club in the hole – actually owing the club money after working their shift," he recalls. "Don't get me wrong; the girls also clean up – sometimes walking away with as much as \$800 after tip-out."

The bottom line, says Debes, is that the clubs employ the dancers and should be expected to follow wage laws. "This is a job for these women," he explains. "It's unfair that they aren't getting paid properly."



**Elizabeth Todd**, regional director of the Department of Labor in Dallas, agrees. "Tipped employees are often subject to minimum wage violations from tip-out practices similar to those alleged," she wrote the *Chronicle* in an e-mail. "Deducting employer costs from required FLSA minimum or overtime wages is illegal."

The clubs' lawyer has until Nov. 11 to respond to Debes' filing. Of his past cases, Debes says that 99% have settled out of court. And even if this case ends in a settlement, he says, the goal is to include a forward-looking agreement requiring the clubs to comply with wage laws. In other words, Debes hopes that with this case, he can get Perfect 10 and Sugar's, as well as other clubs, to comply with federal wage laws by paying at least minimum wage and overtime for the hours their dancers work.

#### FREE (CORPORATE) SPEECH

The big brand-name corporations love advertising. They love it so much that they spend some \$150 billion a year in our country to put all sorts of slickem and hokum on their products, and on their own public images.

But there is one kind of advertising that these same self-aggrandizing outfits despise: ads that challenge their carefully crafted images. A nonprofit doctors' group recently got a blast of corporate wrath when it produced a TV commercial that dared to take on mighty **McDonald's**. The

Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine was challenging the fast-food behemoth to offer some menu choices healthier than its artery-clogging burgers.

The ad was a hoot. It featured the body of a deceased fat man on a cold slab at the morgue. He had a half-eaten burger in his hand, and the McDonald's golden arches logo was superimposed over his deathly white feet. Then an epitaph for the burger-wolfing dead man appeared on the screen: "I was lovin' it."

But when the doctors sought to buy airtime on south Florida television stations – none of them loved it. They showed no sense of humor ... and no sense of free speech. Fox, NBC, ABC, CBS, and others flat-out refused to air the ad. One station initially OK'd it but then weaseled out by saying the commercial could run only if all references to McDonald's were removed.

It seems the stations were afraid of being sued by the burger giant or were afraid that McDonald's would pull its advertising from them. Indeed, corporate headquarters sent a sharp shot across the stations' bows, declaring, "This commercial is outrageous, misleading, and unfair to all consumers."

Unfair to consumers? Most consumers would like to see the public airwaves opened up to the public, not just to bigmoney corporations.

#### CORPORATIONS TAKE THE MONEY AND RUN

The **Federal Reserve**, which controls America's monetary policy, says it is trying to invigorate job creation in our country by cutting interest rates to the bone. This move allows big corporations to borrow money for next to nothing so they can expand and start hiring again.

Great goal! How's it working out?
Well, the first step has gone splendidly.

with such giants as **DuPont**, **Hertz**, **IBM**, **Microsoft**, and **PepsiCo** rushing to grab the windfall. They've borrowed hundreds of billions of dollars at interest rates of less than 1%. However, there's been quite a stumble on step two of the Fed's plan. Rather than putting this enormous stash of cash to work for America, the corporations are simply squirreling it away for their own enrichment, refusing to spend it on the job expansion that our economy desperately needs.


For example, Microsoft – one of the richest corporations on Earth – amassed almost \$5 billion under this "opportunistic borrowing" scheme yet has put none of the cheap money into job creation. Instead, it is using a big chunk of it to buy back stock from its own shareholders – a move that merely profits the handful of rich elites who control Microsoft.

Worse, such corporate powers as Hertz and PepsiCo are using the funds to take over competitors. These consolidations will actually cut jobs while reducing consumer choices and raising our prices. Indeed, there's no provision in the Fed's program to keep the giants from investing the money in foreign expansion, thus offshoring more American jobs.

And there's the rub in nearly all of Washington's indirect job creation efforts – officials blithely dole out billions and even trillions to corporations and banks with no strings attached. So the big shots and bastards gleefully grab the money and run.

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#### Get in the Ring

Perry's refusal to debate is all swagger, no sweat

As the saying goes, politics in Texas is a full-contact sport. That would make being governor the equivalent of being a heavyweight champion. But there are two kinds of champions. There's the fighting champ who never backs down from a brawl and is always out defending his title against all comers. Then there's the kind who holds on to the belt by never getting in the ring. With less than two weeks to go before Election Day, Gov. Rick Perry's strategy for holding on to his office has become plain: Avoid the fight with Democratic challenger and former Houston Mayor Bill White, then hope for a judge's decision at the ballot box.

First was Perry's pointed refusal to meet with editorial boards during endorsement season. Then was his decision not to attend the KLRU gubernatorial candidate debate on Oct. 19. His camp's excuse for skipping the debate was to put the blame on White: Unless White released his tax records from the time he spent serving as deputy secretary of the Department of Energy during the Clinton administration and his time as chair of the Texas Democratic Party, Perry wasn't going to lace up his gloves. The problem for Perry is that this is like welterweight boxer Floyd Mayweather Jr. refusing earlier this year to face Manny Pacquiao unless he submitted to more urine tests than the boxing authorities required. The difference? Pacquiao called Mayweather's bluff, leading to Mayweather backing down. The White campaign, which was already in full compliance with all campaign finance laws, refused Perry's electoral blackmail. That explains why there were only three candidates at the debate, but it doesn't explain why Perry won't spar with either Libertarian Party of Texas gubernatorial candidate Kathie Glass or her Green Party

Glass is the bantamweight in this equation. Last spotted on a statewide ballot in a run for attorney general in 1982, she faces some tough math, since no Libertarian gubernatorial candidate has broken 2%. However, Glass argues it's not that Perry is afraid of facing White in a debate, so much as he doesn't want to have to defend his conserva-

tive credentials: "The issues he says he's in favor of, or that are his strong suit, he's

really very weak on, to the point of being AWOL on the border and our budget."

During the primaries, Perry talked tough about going up against the federal government, publicly musing about Texas' right to secede from the union. But

Libertarians see him as running away from the real challenge. Glass has criticized Perry for continuing to accept federal money and for failing to use Texas military forces to secure the border, and she argued that this lip service to Libertarian ideals will blow back in Perry's face at the ballot box. "He seems to think that he owns our vote and that we're being disloyal by not supporting him," she said. "If he needs our votes to stay in, well maybe that's an indication that it's time for him to go."

Shafto faces an even bigger challenge in making an electoral impact. The last Green to run for governor was Rahul Mahajan



in 2002, who pulled in 0.7% of the vote. This year her party's statewide slate is running under a cloud of suspicion that out-of-state GOP groups funded their ballot access petition drive (see "Greens Gain Ballot Access in Curious Fashion," July 9). But despite any animosity between the Greens and the Dems, Shafto was most pointed about Perry's debate no-show, which she called a snub to both his challengers and the electorate. "You're a public servant," she said. "Get out there and answer the questions." As for Perry's justification, she said: "Bill White's tax returns have nothing to do with it. It was just something for him to hang his hat on."

#### **Perry Spending Habits**

How ready for a fight is Perry? He arguably hasn't faced a tough election since his 1998 knockout of

John Sharp to become lieutenant governor. Promoted to the Governor's Mansion in 2000 when George W. Bush won the presidency, he won his first real election in 2002 when Dem challenger and Laredo oil man Tony Sanchez was less Cinderella Man, more old fashioned palooka. In 2006, Chris Bell failed to captivate the Capitol press corps, which instead was often distracted by the sideshow theatrics of Kinky Friedman and arguments about whether Perry's former Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn could call herself "Grandma" on the ballot. #### **Attorney General: Abbott Amps Up Conservative Credentials**

The Texas attorney general is the state's top law enforcer, the lawyer representing the interests of the state and its people - tasked with both initiating lawsuits on behalf of the residents of the state (think consumer protection cases) and defending the state's laws (think federal appeals in death penalty cases). The A.G. is also the watchdog for open government issues - enforcing public information and open

meetings laws - and is tasked with responding to public officials who require a legal opinion on various issues. In short, the state's A.G. carries a wide sphere of influence.

This year, incumbent A.G. Greg Abbott will face 2006 Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Barbara Ann Radnofsky and Libertarian Jon Roland. Though Radnofsky has attacked Abbott's record on a number of fronts - includ-

ing that he has used the office to bolster his own profile and that of other state GOP officeholders (in particular Gov. Rick Perry) - Abbott is expected to easily win another term.

Abbott began his public service as a state district judge in Houston and was appointed to the Texas Supreme Court in 1995 by then-Gov. George W. Bush. He became attorney general in 2002, defeating Kirk Watson in a costly political fight. He has touted his success in increasing the collection of child support payments; in fact, the state was tops in collections last year, but according to an analysis by The Dallas Morning News, the number of delinquency cases has also grown - five times faster than the national average. Abbott also touts his success in stopping cyberspace child predators and boasts a 100% conviction rate for adults caught trying to meet up with underage girls for sex. But in so doing, Abbott has, at times, contributed to a climate of sex offender hysteria. On a recent Houston PBS political show, Red White & Blue, Abbott claimed that sex offenders have higher recidivism rates than other offenders, but this is simply not true. Federal stats show most sex offenders actually have lower recidivism rates than other offenders. Abbott has increasingly picked battles with the federal government, filing a series of lawsuits

that are little more than attempts to pander to a right-wing base. He is suing to stop health care reform (even though Texas trails the nation in the number of people insured) and to stop the EPA from forcing Texas to comply with the Clean Air Act, and he has filed in support of Arizona's contentious immigration law - all controversial positions which speak more to a narrow political agenda than the interests of all Texans.

Abbott's defense of Arizona's immigration law provided Democrat Radnofsky with one of her most direct hits of the campaign season, when she pointed out that Abbott was making a 180-degree turn from his position just six years ago, when he issued a press release declaring that developing and enforcing immigration laws "is the exclusive domain of the federal government." Radnofsky, a former partner at Vinson & Elkins, was the state Dems' first female candidate for U.S. Senate (she lost that 2006 bid to incumbent Kay Bailey Hutchison). If elected. she says, she would take on insurance and electricity companies for their skyrocketing rates and declare as unconstitutional the margin franchise tax, which she says lawmakers passed to unfairly tax certain businesses without seeking a statewide referendum. Radnofsky has also dogged Abbott for failing to sue Wall

#### EMS Group Rescinds Eckhardt Endorsement

Travis County Commissioner Sarah Eckhardt's (r) support of an outside review of emergency response times has cost her the endorsement of the union representing workers of Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services. Steve Stewart, president of the EMS employees association and chairman of its political committee, notified Eckhardt last week of the group's decision to rescind its endorsement because of the commissioner's support of hiring third-party consultants to review disparities in response times to different areas of the county. Such a move, Stewart said, could lead to privatization of an award-winning public system that's been in place for more than 30 years. Stewart also cited a lack of communication and support from the commissioner and claimed Eckhardt has failed to make "the health and safety of our citizens" a priority during her re-election cam-



paign. "I'm really kind of flummoxed," Eckhardt said in response to Stewart's letter. She said she doesn't favor privatizing EMS and that the Commissioners Court has a strong record of being a "privatization-averse body." An independent study would be useful, she said, to determine why response

times are faster in urban and rural areas than in suburban areas, such as Oak Hill. Eckhardt said the review could result in the county providing more facilities or hiring additional personnel. While the union's decision is disappointing, she added, "It's not going to change the way I'm approaching the issue."

#### Tea Party Group To Release Financial Records

On Monday, the Texas Democratic Party announced it will be receiving the financial records of the King Street Patriots, as demanded in a lawsuit filed against the Houston tea party group last week (see "Tea Partiers Party to Ethics Violations?," Oct. 22). The TDP accuses the KSP of illegally failing to report the source of its funding and of harassing voters in Democrat-heavy precincts in Harris County, especially those with large minority populations. The TDP was scheduled to receive and review the records on Tuesday; at press time, it had not been decided whether the disclosures were sufficient to stave off a Thursday hearing on the suit. – Lee Nichols

Street firms she says have bilked Texas tax-payers out of billions of dollars through bad investments, including those of the Texas Permanent School Fund; she says her commonsense approach would seek redress in a similar manner to previous tobacco litigation. Abbott has so far failed to refute Radnofsky's proposal, save a vague suggestion that it was somehow too novel a legal approach to take. The Dallas Morning News backed Radnofsky, saying she's not only prepared for the job but would "back off from battles the state can't win – and shouldn't be fighting." Abbott, the paper noted, has taken too much time to "tilt at Washington's windmills."

Real estate investor and self-described "computer professional" Roland, making his third consecutive run for A.G. as a Libertarian, is the founder and CEO of the Constitution Society, which aims to "provide almost everything one needs to accurately decide what is and is not constitutional in most situations." According to his campaign website, Roland would use his power as A.G. to investigate local public corruption allegations, intervene to protect Texans from "abuse by federal officials," and act against public officials, "especially judges and prosecutors, who protect illegal drug trafficking." – Jordan Smith



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However, that race showed the dangers of trying to skate through an election, with Perry's unimpressive share of the vote earning him the nickname "Governor 39%."

His absence this year has left the White campaign shadowboxing, but they've tried to land some body blows where Perry has claimed he is a champion. The incumbent has always touted that he has made Texas businessfriendly, but White argues that he's a little too business-friendly and a little too free with the state's money. Most recently, White has raised claims of malfeasance at the \$102.4 billion Teacher Retirement System, pointing to firms owned and managed by Perry donors that gained big contracts with big fees. White's team distributed a 2008 memo by Michael Green, director of TRS' investment division's private markets, in which he wrote: "Rationalizing violations of TRS directives, policies and procedures, devaluing of personal and professional ethics, and the violations of state laws have become increasingly familiar." A nine-month investigation by the Travis County Attorney's Office found no criminal activity, but White quickly fired back, setting aside the question of whether the actions were legal or illegal. "Either way," he said, "milking teachers' retirement funds for campaign contributions is wrong."

The White campaign has made similar jabs at two other funds under Perry's control: the Texas Enterprise Fund and the Emerging Technology Fund, which had already taken blows from legislators. In 2009, Perry moved \$120 million from the enterprise fund into the tech fund, which then gave \$50 million to his old alma mater, Texas A&M. The enterprise fund is paid for out of surpluses from the Unemployment Compensation Fund, which at that point only had \$48 million in its coffers, or roughly 5% of what it needed to be solvent. Austin state Rep. Dawnna Dukes, who sits on the House Appropriations Committee, recalls that there was "great concern" about that transfer, as well as "concerns about the application and the oversight of those funds." While the Legislature did pass new rules requiring the Governor's Office to post annual breakdowns of the tech fund's operations, the House originally considered a measure to transfer the funds out from under the control of the Governor's Office. However, Dukes said, "members of Senate Finance blocked it."

Perry might quickly find that that victory was just round one. Rep. Mark Strama, chair of the House Technology, Economic Development & Workforce Committee, said his committee is waiting on a staff report on changing the tech fund's governance structure. With the current scandals piled on the old concerns and a pending \$24 billion state budget deficit making financial transparency a must, Strama was convinced it will be much easier to get bipartisan and bicameral support this time. No matter who holds the keys to the Governor's Mansion next session, said Strama, "It's another case for getting both those funds outside of the political office and into a more insulated governance entity that can't be accused of being political."

#### **Reading the Redistricting Tea Leaves**

Immigration, Bailouts, Government spending. Unemployment.

These are the headline issues of this election. But this election is crucial for another reason that hasn't been discussed much, yet will make an impact for the next decade: the drawing of new political lines based on the decennial federal census. And if there is any group of people that knows the effect redistricting can have, it's Austinites.

For almost its entire history, Austin (and Travis County) was completely contained within the boundaries of Congressional District 10. That, of course, changed in the infamous and unprecedented mid-decade redistricting spearheaded by then-U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay. State legislatures can be as partisan as they want in drawing the maps, as long as they don't violate anyone's civil rights, and that was fully felt in the 2003 fiasco. I won't recount the whole sordid history here, but the short version is: The GOP chopped up Travis into districts 10, 21, and 25, with District 10 stretching from West Lake Hills to suburban Houston, forcing most of liberal Austin to live under Republican representation since 2005. (Similarly clever map-drawing in 2001 caused Travis' state House delegation to go from a 4-1 Democratic advantage to a 3-3 split, though Republican incompetence and smart Dem campaigning turned Travis solid blue in 2006.) While Democrats got very close to taking the Texas House in 2008, odds this cycle are high that Republicans will still hold the reins after Nov. 2.

Given Austin's population growth, you can bet that after the 2011 legislative session, our districts will be radically different yet again. Assuming no more Tom DeLay-like shenanigans or court orders, they will be the districts we live with until 2021. At the federal level.

Texas will pick up an estimated

three to four new seats, on top of the 32 we already have (out of the total of 435). In the state Legislature, there are 150 House seats and 31 in the Senate, with boundaries shifting according to population. Among the local possibilities: State Sen. Kirk Watson's District 14 will almost certainly

shrink, but Republicans might try to carve into his liberal urban base rather than make the logical move, taking away the conservative western precincts. In the House, Travis County could grow from six reps to seven, and maybe Williamson and Hays will add on, too. West Texas, steadily losing population to urbanization trends, will lose at least one seat.

And who knows how Austin's congressional delegation will look - many of the same imaginative minds will be drawing the lines as did in the last debacle. - Lee Nichols





#### **All Workman** and No Play

It's been a tough week for Republican House District 47 candidate Paul Workman. On Oct. 21, his campaign confirmed that he's been diagnosed with prostate cancer and will undergo surgery in November. He has already promised to continue campaigning. The flip side, of course, is that he can also be campaigned against. While incumbent Democrat Valinda Bolton's first action after the announcement was to offer her sympathy to her opponent, supporters of Libertarian Kris Bailey have been targeting the GOPer as a fake conservative.

Rob Morrow, former delegate to the state Republican convention, has been leading the charge against Workman, whom he accused of being "a typical Republican statist." Hammering the developer for his support of toll roads and development subsidies, he reserved particular vitriol for Workman's TV ad attacking Bolton for voting against Texas' version of Jessica's Law: Bolton was among a group of lawmakers who, with the Texas Association Against Sexual Assault, argued that certain clauses would increase the risks for victims and decrease prosecutions of sexual predators, the intended target. The U.S. Supreme Court has already ruled similar clauses in a Louisiana law unconstitutional. Bolton's 2008 GOP opponent Donna Keel tried the same smear tactic, even though Bolton has served as the training director for the National Center on Domestic and Sexual Violence. Condemning Workman's misrepresentation of Bolton's vote, Morrow said, "When you have nothing to say about small government issues, you use sleazy diversionary tactics."

Not all Democrats can take succor from Morrow's attacks - in fact, he criticizes Sen. Kirk Watson for being too close to Workman and Gov. Rick Perry - but Workman's Libertarian troubles suggest a broader problem for the Texas GOP. While he has conceded that odds of the Libertarian Party winning any state House or statewide seats are still long, Libertarian Party of Texas Chair Pat Dixon says his candidates will make a bigger difference this year than ever. "The tea party effort has exposed some people to some of the concepts" of libertarianism, he said - the question is whether on Nov. 2 "those tea party votes will go to social conservatives or toward Libertarians." While he expects some bump from Democrats disappointed in the current administration's failure to deliver on social liberties issues, he believes the GOP remains most threatened by his members: "Those people that think that, all of a sudden, if we elect Republicans back to the state government or to Congress, everything's going to change - well, we've been there before." #### Dollars to Donors in Bond Election


Eight-day-out campaign finance reports are in for groups for and against the city's \$90 million mobility bond election. Pro-bond Get Austin Moving PAC reports \$42,484 in contributions, \$34,013 in expenditures, and more than \$49,000 in the bank as of Oct. 23. Contributors include several twowheel retailers (Alien Scooters, Mellow Johnny's, Bicycle Sport Shop, and others), plus zoning attorney Nikelle Meade, the law offices of Armbrust & Brown, and gaming guru and part-time astronaut Richard Garriott, who contributed \$2,500. Bond opponents are highlighting a \$1,000 contribution from former Halliburton subsidiary KBR, along with contributions from out-of-town engineering and construction consultants, though local builders outnumber those donors. Most of GAM's spending went to canvassing. From the opposition, Engineers Affirming Sustainable Transportation PAC reports \$2,650 in contributions, \$2,158 in expenditures, and \$3,492 cash on hand, bolstered by a loan of \$3,000, apparently from Jim Skaggs, who also contributed \$2,000. All the spending has gone to signs. Sensible Transportation Solutions for Austin PAC reports \$42,290 in contributions, practically all from former Texas Monthly Publisher Mike Levy, though Skaggs also gave \$10,000. Newspaper ads, printing, and a mailing list comprise Levy's in-kind contributions.

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

## AUSTIN LYRIC OPERA'S STAMPEDE

#### Wranglin' every kind of music in town

When you talk up that "live music capital of the world" thing, you include opera in the mix, right? Well, you should. Austin Lyric Opera includes almost every other kind of music in *its* mix. At its Armstrong Community Music School – the first community music school in the country run by an opera company, by the way – you can receive instruction in opera and classical music as well as jazz, bluegrass, blues, folk, you name it, taught by the likes of Darden Smith, Michael Fracasso, and Seth Walker. When ALO decided to start its own festival to raise funds for the school's programs and scholarships, it didn't limit itself to arias and overtures; it added a mess of blues, Latino rock, and Western swing. What's more, it's sharing some of the proceeds from these festival concerts with the Health Alliance for Austin Musicians. How's that for inclusive?

Dubbed the Stampede, the festival provides a weeklong launch to ALO's 24th season. Audiences can enjoy unplugged concerts by Del Castillo and Seth Walker in the intimacy of Ducloux Hall at the Mary Ann Heller Opera Center, a giant concert celebrating the 40th anniversary of Ray Benson and Asleep at the Wheel with Willie Nelson along for the ride, Master Pancake Theater mocking *Pretty Woman*, and, oh yes, even some opera: a new production of Verdi's *La Traviata* from ALO.

The idea for the Stampede came from ALO General Director Kevin Patterson, but he credits Benson, who has served on the opera's advisory council for years, with providing some key input. "Ray just kinda threw out: 'We know that you do all these things in the music school, so why don't you highlight all these styles and look for musicians who not only identify with these styles but have some musical background that connects what you're doing to the school?'"

Not surprisingly, Benson and the Wheel signed on pretty quickly. (More surprisingly, they'll be performing in Dell Hall on the *Traviata* set.) And in line with the Armstrong School's mission, the Wheel, Walker, and Del Castillo will each conduct an afternoon workshop on their respective styles of music open to musicmakers of every level. It supports the idea, Patterson says, that "we are that community resource for musicians. We're nurturing not only the dreams of students and young adults who might go on and become professional musicians in Austin but also the computer programmer who plays in a garage band. We're nurturing creativity

#### TAPESTRY DANCE COMPANY Word up, rhythm!

When you see the word "rhythm" in front of "tap," it's not there just to take up space – it's your reminder that this art form is about more than the sound of dancing across a field of firecrackers. It's about using those taps as instruments, the way a percussionist uses mallets or sticks to sound out complicated cadences, invigorating pulses, heart-quickening beats – in short, to make music. In recent shows, nationally acclaimed Tapestry Dance Company has been making rhythm even more explicit in its tap work, encouraging its dancers to play off jazz, improvising steps and sounds like soloists in a combo.

Now, Artistic Director Acia Gray is exploring how the rhythms created by her dancers' feet play out against rhythms made by a mouth – not singing, but speaking. The opener to Tapestry's 2010-2011 season, *Voices of Rhythm*, brings spoken word into the mix, with poet/hip-hop theatre artist Zell Miller III – an "inventive and incendiary wordsmith" and "dazzling stringer-together of words and bringer of truth," as we've called the multiple award-winner in these pages – laying down the linguistic moves against

the footwork of the fast-tapping Tapestry corps.

By the by, you'll see some new feet in that crew this season. #### NEW WORKS THEATER COMMUNITY

#### United we stage

Austin's national reputation as a theatre city, one in which exceptional new work is generated and supported, just received a big boost - a \$90,000 boost. That's how much the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation awarded to a newly formed coalition of area theatre companies and theatre artists that develop and produce new material for the stage. The grant will support the efforts of these groups and individuals over the next year and a half to plan, collaborate, and share resources in a systematic way that will make Austin, in the grant's words, "a national center of new work that nurtures artists and audiences within a resilient and diverse cultural ecosystem." If that goal is achieved, the system established here could serve as a model for other theatre scenes around the country.

The New Works Theater Community, as this confederation is called, echoes previous efforts in the stage scene to join together as a community - the Austin Circle of Theaters in the Seventies, the RAT Conference in the Nineties - but it's the first time such an endeavor has been directed toward new play development or won this kind of financial backing. The spark for it actually came from Mellon's national survey on the development and support for new theatrical work, when David Dower, formerly of San Francisco's Z Space Studio and currently with Washington, D.C.'s Arena Stage, made a trip to town. In a meeting with representatives of assorted companies, Dower suggested they apply for funding as a community. So they started meeting and hammering out what they wanted their community to be and how they would utilize funding. Katie Pearl of Physical Plant Theater and Vortex Repertory Company Artistic Director Bonnie Cullum took on leadership roles in the process, and Greater Austin Creative Alliance Executive Director Latifah Taormina arranged for the alliance to serve as the community's fiscal sponsor. Now, in the administration of the grant, Pearl will act as community liaison and Cullum will manage the grant, while Vortex Managing Director Heather Barfield will serve as grant administrator.

The New Works Theater Community currently consists of the Greater Austin Creative Alliance, Cambiare Productions, DA! Theatre Collective. Fusebox Festival, Loaded Gun Theory, Paper Chairs, Physical Plant Theater, Poison Apple Initiative, ProArts Collective, Rubber Repertory, Rude Mechanicals, Salvage Vanguard Theater, ScriptWorks, Shrewd Productions, Teatro Vivo, Trouble Puppet Theater Company, Vestige Group, and Vortex Repertory Company. Affiliated as independents are playwrights Martha Lynn Coon, C. Denby Swanson, and Sarah Saltwick; lighting designers Megan Reilly and Stephen Pruitt; writerperformers Hannah Kenah and Paul Bonin-Rodriguez; writer-director J.D. Nasaw; producer-performer Nigel O'Hearn; producer-director Graham Schmidt; and arts administrator Etta Sanders.

#### **Dark Insinuations**

Ray Donley steps from the shadows to talk about his art

The woman peers directly at us, but her eyes are lost in shadow. Darkness shrouds the recesses below her brows like patches of sable velvet, dense and lush and strangely inviting. In fact, that same blackness envelops her almost completely, encasing her head, blanketing her shoulders and most of her torso, wrapping around her throat like a great dark scarf or the arm of some ominous, unseen creature. And it fills the space behind her, threatening to swallow her in its inky depths.

In this painting by Ray Donley, as in so much of his work, darkness is a persistent presence, a force to be reckoned with. The Austin artist routinely cloaks his subjects in its ebony folds, obscuring limbs, hands, and bodies to the point that the darkness appears to physically restrain them, even smother them. It stains their features, at times turning faces into masks – those not already wearing masks, at least. Donley's shadows are almost living things – from which his figures emerge, into which they sink, with which they

struggle. They are a large part of what gives his work its mystery and allure, what has galleries across the U.S. and Europe showing his art, and what keeps collectors buying it. But more significantly, they are a potent expression of the artist's psyche and point of view. That his new solo exhibition, opening Nov. 2 at the Russell Collection Fine Art Gallery, is titled "Terminal Confessions" should tell you a lot about the dance with darkness in Ray Donley's art.

Donley's style - figurative, dramatic, full of high-contrast lighting - evokes that of the Old Masters, particularly the Dutch and Spanish portraitists of the 17th century, quite deliberately. That was the work that interested him as a young man - painters of the 14th and 15th centuries were, he says, "too Apollonian to me, too statuelike. By the 17th century, the painters looked like they were having fun. They were slapping the paint around." And that's what he sought to emulate when he became a studio art major at the University of Texas. But he couldn't find an instructor willing to help him develop that style, so he switched to art history and began to school himself. Donley calls himself "something of an autodidact," learning how to paint like an Old Master by immersing himself in the work of Caravaggio, Rembrandt, Velázquez, and Frans Hals and absorbing everything he could about their artistry. "My change to art history opened up so many doors aesthetically that I was able to see what I really wanted to do and refine what I wanted to do," Donley says. "I wanted to know

the history of painting, the sociology, the phenomenology, the craft of painting, the fact of painting – I wanted to learn and master all of that."

But Donley wasn't soaking up all that knowledge to merely mimic what had been done three centuries earlier. "It's one thing to say, 'I want to paint like a 17th century Master,'" the artist says. "Well, that's nothing in and of itself. In fact, a lot of people do that, and it certainly is a craft; they've mastered a craft. But that's all they do. I was never interested in that. I just wanted that as a point of departure, so I could say something personal, hopefully something universal, in a unique kind of way."

What Donley had to say was bound up in the alienation he had experienced as a young man "forced" into a small, rural Baptist community in Central Texas. "You begin to sense that there are other minds, and those other minds are not like yours," he recalls. "You begin to awaken to the fact that you're different, that you perceive the world differently and don't understand why others don't. It's that moment of unalloyed alienation that you feel that you're distinct and that you're not part of the group.

"If artists are intellectually honest with themselves, emotionally honest, they feel that sense of being different, and there's a time when you're young when that's very painful because you don't understand it. But later on, when you turn away from that in a conscious way, you learn that there are other minds like yours, and it becomes a source not of depression but of celebration. You celebrate the fact that you're different. And if you're very, very good and very, very secure, you use that to

express what you've experienced in your life and hopefully connect with other people."

A voracious reader, Donley gravitates toward writers and philosophers whose perspectives resonate with his own "dark and caustic view of the human condition." Conversations with Donley are as apt to reference Nietzsche, Beckett, Baudelaire, and Poe as Velázquez and Hals. "These people had a certain outlook on life that I shared," he says. "I think to this day the greatest literary exposition on this duality is Hermann Hesse in *Demian*. He talks about the sphere of darkness and the sphere of light and how each of us is drawn to one or the other. He was drawn to darkness, this kind of nocturnal aesthetic. It nourishes me in a way that something like painting flowers wouldn't."

In his art, Donley applies the potent chiaroscuro he learned from Caravaggio and his peers to fashion his very theatrical creatures of the night, figures in 17th century robes and caps, capes and masks, emerging from the darkness. The heavy use of shadows, Donley notes, "kicks it up another psychological notch. There have been whole books written on the nature of shadows and what they mean to human behavior and human psychology. It's a very poignant device to use, so I'm going to use it. I'm going to exploit it."

He's intent on using and exploiting that psychological device because, despite feeling alienated, Donley is also drawn to connect with others – at least others of like mind, people who share his point of view or are open to it. ("Let the rest all go to hell," he growls jokingly.) Like

Groucho, Donley wouldn't want to belong to any club that would have him as a member. ("I'll drink to that," he says, hoisting a glass of Guinness.) "If everybody liked my work, I would say I'm doing something totally wrong. Instead, I've developed this cult following, which I'm supremely comfortable with. I just don't want to get too popular."

Some three decades into his artistic career, Donley seems to have found an awfully sweet spot for an artist of such "dark insinuations." He shows regularly in a number of high-end galleries – Sarah Bain Gallery in Los Angeles; Blackheath and Medici galleries in London; Laura Rathe Fine Art in Houston; Touchet Gallery in Baltimore; Gallery Bienvenu in New







Orleans; Meyer Gallery in Park City, Utah; Marshall LeKae Gallery in Scottsdale, Ariz.; Principle Gallery in Alexandria, Va. – but he's still able to live in his hometown, where he has a comfortable home in French Place and easy access to the pubs he haunts whenever he isn't in the studio (which is often 14 hours a day). And being in Austin gives him the opportunity to try new things that he wouldn't show at any of those East Coast, West Coast, or London galleries, such as the 3-foot-by-5-foot photographs he'll be exhibiting for the first time in this Russell Collection exhibition. (They're drawn from images he took as source material in sessions with his model at Salvage Vanguard Theater.)

Best of all, perhaps, is that for Donley, the act of painting is still fulfilling. "It's very therapeutic, just smearing the stuff around," he says. "Getting your fingers in it and manipulating it is a satisfying and therapeutic kind of practice." Moreover, he says: "I'm quite happy where I am. I've reached a level I've always sought to achieve." 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#### **HOW TO LIVE SAFELY IN A SCIENCE FICTIONAL UNIVERSE: A NOVEL**

by Charles Yu

Pantheon, 256 pp., \$24

It's telling that the protagonist in Charles Yu's debut novel is named Charles Yu - it's one of the first clues we get in

this parallel narrative, one that defies the tenses of past, present, and future. Yu is a time machine repairman living in Minor Universe 31, a time corridor that used to be New York City before New York City and Los Angeles abruptly merged and created wormholes to alternate fictional realities. Douglas Adams and Philip K. Dick are touchstones, but Yu's sense of humor and narrative splashes of color - especially when dealing with a pretty solitary life and the bittersweet search for his father, a time travel pioneer who disappeared

- set him apart within the narrative spaces of his own horizontal design. He has a dog, Ed; the company of Tammy, his perpetually worried operating system; and occasional interaction with his boss, Phil, "an old copy of Microsoft Middle Manager 3.0." There are also sexbots for purchase. The title's emphasis on "fictional" doesn't lessen the sorrow of life on the infinite


kill your future self? How do you get unstuck from a Yu's fictional universe, where you can purchase False Memories of Home chewing gum, among other things. The way he smartly balances emotional narrative with engineer-speak reflects the story's half-finished landscapes and ruptured lives. and he does it so often you literally feel like you're there in the shower-sized interior



bittersweet conclusion with the final tale of Tiffany Aching, the young witch on the mystical planet called Discworld. Across the first three books in the sequence of young adult novels (The

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Wee Free Men. A Hat Full of Sky, and Wintersmith), Tiffany went from callow apprentice to respected hag o' the hills. Aided and occasionally hindered by the wild and raucous Nac Mac Feegle clan (half-pixie, half-Pictish warriors, all comic relief), Tiffany is the voice of common sense in the earthy farming community of the Chalk. Pratchett is never one to blanch at the grimmer realities of life, and he uses his impish humor to leaven a tale of all too familiar social woes like teen pregnancy and mob violence. Normally,

that's nothing a young witch like Tiffany can't deal with, but when one family argument turns violent, the conflict creates enough space to let a dark force called the Cunning Man inject himself into the world with deadly intent. It's a



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


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rich narrative broth here, and it helps that no fantasy novelist is better at world-building than Pratchett. But forget sorting hats and pet dragons: It's all about headology, the Discworld term for psychology. That's the real power of witches, getting people to do what they want without using spells. Magic is dangerous, unpredictable stuff, and a sensible, young witch like Miss Aching knows the best way to deal with elves and sorcerers and the like is an iron frying pan to the face. But what to hit when your enemy has no face? The Cunning Man is a classic Pratchett villain, less an entity and more a force of raw, blind emotion. The battle in this morality tale isn't wands vs. broomsticks but fear vs. smarts, and that's pure Pratchett country. He chronicles Tiffany's final battle and her passage into womanhood with a seasoned pen that, even after nearly 50 novels, is still fresh and joyous. When it comes to headology, he's still the chief wizard. - Richard Whittaker





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

#### **Round Rock Honey Celebrates a Million Bottles**

Nine years after installing his first backyard hive, **Konrad Bouffard** of Round Rock Honey (www.roundrockhoney.com) is about to sell his millionth bottle of local raw honey. If it's a challenge to wrap your head around that, try contemplating the numbers of blossoms contributing nectar and pollen or the number of bees on the job or even how many times beekeeper Bouffard has jumped into his protective bee gear to extract heavy racks of dripping honeycomb from a buzzing hive (see "A Man, a Plan, and Some Bees," June 12, 2009).

Since selling the first bottle at the Downtown Austin Farmers' Market, Round Rock Honey has steadily built a devoted fan base that appreciates the complex wildflower flavors and potential health benefits of ingesting local pollens, as well as the facts that the honey hasn't been heated or treated and is regularly lab-tested for any pesticides. In the past 18 months, however, "business has become absolutely phenomenal," says an

exuberant Bouffard. "We've grown at twice the rate I thought we would."

Bouffard has retired from his day job teaching high school to work full-time with the bees and teach beekeeping classes. "I feel comfortable enough now to put all my eggs in the honey basket," he says. And that basket's getting bigger: Bouffard sells his honey online, in 24 farmers' markets in the Austin and Dallas regions, and in Central Market, Whole Foods, and Sprouts. In addition, an increasing numbers of chefs – along with producers of local artisanal foods, beers, and spirits – are using the honey as an ingredient.

Oh, yeah, what happens with Bottle
Number One Million? It'll be tagged with a
special sticker under the cap, awarding the
lucky purchaser with a handblown jar by
San Antonio glass artist Gini Garcia. It'll
be filled with – what else – a gallon of
Round Rock Honey. – MM Pack

The local food presented at Sunday's Green Corn Project benefit was particularly wonderful. The crowd was wowed by Mulberry's Gorgonzola-stuffed dates wrapped in candied bacon, pear conserve and pumpkin butter from Confituras, Sticky Toffee Pudding Co.'s namesake, Tèo's salty caramel gelato, grilled salmon on arugula with chick peas and pomegranates from the Alamo Drafthouse, and Terry Conlan's spicy deep-fried black-eyed-pea fritters. I was pleased to get the chance to try the excellent wood-fired Bola Pizza (453-7223, www.bolapizza.com) created by caterers Christian and Jamie Bowers in their portable wood-burning oven. It's really marvelous - a crisp, toasted crust topped with homemade sauce, local herbs and vegetables, cheeses from Antonelli's Cheese Shop, and salumi and charcuterie from Salt & Time and Kocurek Family Artisanal Charcuterie. The Italian-made Forno Bravo oven is mounted on a trailer and decorated with ceramic tiles designed by a local artist. The Bowers are only available for catering private parties at the moment, but Sustainable Food Center's Farmers' Market Director Suzanne Santos told me on Sunday that she'd love to see Bola Pizza being served at the Downtown Farmers' Market someday soon. It turns out City Council has an item on today's (Oct. 28) agenda that would allow for the permitting of hot food preparation at certified local farmers' markets on a regular basis. That could mean Bola Pizza in addition to Dai Due's stellar hot biscuits and sausage gravy! We'll keep you posted on how that vote turns out and when the new permits would be available... If processed food is your idea of a ghoulish nightmare, dress up as the most disgusting processed food imaginable and show up at your neighborhood Chipotle Mexican Grill (www.chipotle.com) for a \$2 burrito on Oct. 31 between 6pm and closing. Chipotle will donate all proceeds from Boorito 2010 to Jamie Oliver's Food Revolution... # **An Altar-nate View**

#### Traditions of Día de los Muertos

Although many cultures worldwide have some form of tribute or celebration to honor the dead, none can compare to Mexico's Día de los Muertos. The celebrations that take place between Oct. 31 and Nov. 2 across Central and Southern Mexico are so unique and unparalleled that they were inscribed by UNESCO on its Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity in 2008. Although this tradition is not commonly celebrated in Northern Mexico, it has been widely embraced in the U.S., and Austinites have a very special affection for it. My personal predilection for this holiday dates back to childhood.

My elementary school teachers were passionate about preserving the traditions of Mexico, so they taught us about Día de los Muertos at an early age. They feared that this celebration was in real danger of disappearing due to Halloween permeating our daily Mexican culture, and in hindsight, they were right. Thankfully their efforts paid off, as many of my schoolmates and I have continued promoting and celebrating this tradition into adulthood. Almost every year since I moved to Austin in 1984, I've set up an ofrenda. Traveling back to Mexico City and Oaxaca over the years, I have amassed a collection of figurines, papel picado, and other folk art related to the festivities. Thanks to my husband Will Larson's art background, we were invited to present an altar at the Blue Star Contemporary Art Center exhibit in San Antonio in 2004, and last year we displayed one at the Mexic-Arte Museum in honor of Lady Bird Johnson. The altars we set up at the house are small and usually dedicated to our departed friends and family, with the occasional addition of admired celebrities and personalities who may have passed away during the year: Julia Child and Joe Strummer have been previous "guests" at our ofrenda and feast. I enjoy cooking traditional dishes often enjoyed in Mexico during the three-day holiday, such as mole, tamales, and candied fruit. I've never made pan de muerto from scratch, but I may try it this year as I now possess a prized recipe from my Aunt Elsa, who passed away a couple of years ago. Curious to know other people's reasons for embracing this holiday, I spoke to a few folks from different backgrounds and professions whom I know celebrate Day of the Dead in one way or another.

Garden designer and writer Lucinda Hutson was born and raised in El Paso, where she absorbed and fell in love with the culture and traditions of Mexico. Over the years, she has traveled many times to Pátzcuro, Michoacán, for Day of the Dead, visiting the graveyards and familiarizing herself with the customs. "Dying is something we all do," she says. "I

love the way the Mexicans poke fun at death with their funny figurines and calaveras depicting life on Earth. Live it, love it while you can! You can't take it with you!" Hutson is always ready for a fiesta and is one of the best party hostesses I know. The Día de los Muertos parties and ofrendas at her Rosedale garden home are legendary and have even been featured on PBS' Central Texas Gardener. "I invite guests to bring candles and mementos of their dearly deceased, and we build a big altar in my garden replete with marigolds and candles, fruit and food. I have quite a collection of Day of the Dead figurines, sugar skulls, calaveras, et cetera that I bring out each year," she says. "We have a prayer circle and moment of silence where we honor and remember our loved ones and share stories about them. It is a very moving evening for all who attend children and adults alike. This is a good way for children to learn about their ancestors.' Hutson's guests are treated to Mexican hot chocolate, atole, plenty of Day of the Dead bread from Mi Victoria Bakery, and usually some tequila punch, too. At the moment, Hutson is busy wrapping up the manuscript for the long-awaited second edition of her book iTequila! Cooking With the Spirit of Mexico, to be published by UT Press, so she's not sure she'll be able to have a celebration this year. If it happens, she says, "it will probably be a lastminute thing."

Amber O'Connor is a doctoral candidate in anthropology at the University of Texas at Austin who specializes in Mesoamerican studies, and she's also a graduate of Le Cordon Bleu College of Culinary Arts in Austin (formerly Texas Culinary Academy). She focuses her formal studies on foodways, and during the time she spent in Oaxaca learning culinary traditions, she discovered an instant affinity for Día de los Muertos. "Halloween was one of my favorite holidays growing up, and I always loved the feeling that anything might happen," she says. "I think there's a great overlap in traditions in Texas, but also there are shared symbols, which eases acceptance of Day of the Dead traditions." Last fall, during the Mexic-Arte Museum's Viva la Vida Fest, O'Connor presented a fascinating paper about Hanal Pixán, the Yucatecan Maya celebration of the dead, based on research she conducted in Quintana Roo. In her presentation, she mentioned how the fancy decorated altars we know in Central Mexico were not a part of Yucatecan tradition until the government held competitions with cash rewards. "Similar to post-Civil War America's use of Thanksgiving to create a national culture, Mexico chose Día de los Muertos as its nation-building holiday, finding it to be a unifier of indigenous ritual and Christian Spanish heritage and a way to claim a unique identity for Mexico," she



# **Inside Kate Heyhoe's Skull**

Wimberley resident Kate Heyhoe has a long history in the food business as one of the pioneers of online food writing, an editor of The Global Gourmet for 14 years, and author of eight books on food and wine. But her latest endeavor is a complete 180-degree turnaround. Inspired by Day of the Dead sugar skulls, she is currently making what she calls Dreams of the Dead sugar skulls. Cast in sugar just like traditional Day of the Dead calaveritas, Heyhoe's are not only adorned on the outside with icing and sugar paste, but they're also decorated on the inside with tiny handcrafted dioramas using antique papers, feathers, bones, hand-tinted parchment, and found objects. These works of whimsical art range in size from that of a Ping-Pong ball to almost life-size. Larger ones even include white or black-light LEDs that can be battery-powered or used as plug-in night-light fixtures. Some even flicker like candles, and many of them feature elaborate headdresses. Skulls undergo 20 stages of development, from casting to icing, drilling, decorating, and lighting. Each is an original, unique, numbered and signed artwork that will last indefinitely with proper care. "I also make custom skulls, using your own objects and photos, as shrines to loved ones, gifts, depictions of your business, or as arty conversation pieces," says Heyhoe. In Austin, they're currently sold at Authenticity Gallery, Yard Dog Gallery, and the Mexic-Arte Museum, or order directly through her website, www.insidemyskull.com.

writes. "While government involvement has changed the nature of small traditions into a large-scale national holiday with newly codified symbols and meaning, it has possibly increased the practice of traditional foodways since it is still honoring ancestors with their favorite foods. I am personally interested to see if these foods will change as the favorite dishes of the young become pizza, hamburgers, and Sabritas." Aside from her scholarly interest, O'Connor is one of many Anglo-Americans who are fully adopting a personal observance of Day of the Dead. "In the past I'd always just set up a generic ofrenda, but now it is dedicated to my cat, who died in October last year. I buy some sugar skulls and put a piece of her favorite blanket up with her ashes and a candle," she says. "I feel Halloween in the U.S. has gotten away from the spooky and has dived headfirst into commercialism. I mean, the kids don't even say 'trick or treat' any more, and I've been asked to be cautious

about how scary my decorations are for the 'trick-or-treaters' in the neighborhood. I feel Día de los Muertos still embraces some of the magic I loved as a kid, although I realize it is changing with increased globalization as

Mexic-Arte Museum Education Program Manager Claudia Zapata is a native Austinite with a master's degree in art history from UT-Austin. "I have a specific memory of dressing up as a devil and tasting Mexican hot chocolate for the first time at a Mexic-Arte Museum event," she recalls. "As a third-generation Mexican-American, I celebrate Día de los Muertos out of a subjective necessity to preserve the cultural traditions of my ancestors. My family primarily attends community-sponsored cultural events related to Day of the Dead in San Antonio or Austin." As she gears up for the flurry of activities for the annual Viva la Vida Fest, Zapata continues to be


#### MY SWEET MEXICO: RECIPES FOR AUTHENTIC PASTRIES, BREADS, CANDIES, BEVERAGES, AND FROZEN TREATS

by Fany Gerson (Ten Speed Press, 224 pp., \$30)

"Sweetness in Mexico is found all around – in the intimacy of the home, at birthday parties, at patriotic holidays, during religious celebrations, and even at death." Thus begins Fany Gerson's *My Sweet Mexico*, a definitive compendium of the sweet dishes of our neighbor to the south – never before collected in an English-language book.

Gerson is native to Mexico City, a graduate of the Culinary Institute of America, a resident of New York City, and a former pastry chef at Rosa Mexicano and Eleven Madison Park. She spent five years traversing Mexico's regions, seeking the best recipes for the sweet breads, cakes, cookies, puddings, candies, fruit concoctions, drinks, and frozen desserts so dear to the Mexican heart and palate.

Meticulously documented and gorgeously photographed by Ed Anderson, these sweet recipes represent an important facet of Mexico's culinary history – ingredients range from pre-Columbian chocolate, vanilla, canela, agave, and



prickly pear, to the Spaniards' introduction of sugar and the rich confections prepared in Colonial-era convents, to present-day desserts in which traditional ingredients intersect with modern kitchen technology and creativity.

Although some recipes are easily accomplished, this isn't a book for beginners, and many of the dishes require some investment of time and energy. Gerson provides detailed glossaries of specialized ingredients and equipment, and her instructions are lucid, but there's an inherent expectation that readers know their ways around the kitchen.

If, however, you've got memories of sweet eating in Mexico (or visions of sugarplums) and you're willing to commit to some quality kitchen time, the rewards are huge. I wowed a dinner party with tangy cajeta (goat's milk caramel) ice cream and impressed myself with the quintessential special-occasion cake, pastel de tres leches. I'm not too accomplished with candy, but I managed a perfect limescented jamoncillo de leche (silky milk fudge). For a seasonal treat, I recommend the earthy calabaza en tacha (candied pumpkin), traditionally eaten for Day of the Dead. A simple preparation, it simmers for a slow three hours with orange peel, clove, and cinnamon in dark piloncillo syrup. - MM Pack

intrigued by the connection to the pre-Columbian world throughout the Day of the Dead celebrations, such as the linguistic appropriations from the Nahuatl language, and the direct and indirect similarities between the ways ancient Mesoamerican cultures and modern society venerate ancestors. "I think the proximity to the Halloween celebrations allow a readily easy pairing of the two holidays. The ornate elements of the holidays and practices, and the influx of a Latino population in the United States, create a perfect storm for Day of the Dead celebrations to become a norm in American festivities," she states. Although her family does not prepare specific Day of the Dead-related food, there are always sugar skulls in the kitchen during October. "Finding sugar skulls among sliced bread and cereal in my families' kitchens has become an enjoyed

J.P. Hayes, owner of award-winning Sgt. Pepper's hot sauce company, has been hosting Day of the Dead parties at his home since 2000, "as an extension of Halloween, I guess. The skulls and skeletons decor do cross over well, and it seemed a waste to decorate the whole house for just one day of celebration," he laughs. "Plus, I like the atmosphere with candles and such." In fact, the brightly colored walls inside his home are inspired by Mexican folk art and are decorated with Day of the Dead artifacts throughout. Since Hayes is an avid cook, it didn't take long for his celebration to become all about the food. "I really got into Mexican cooking, so Day of the Dead became my excuse for throwing a Mexican-themed party. I cook everything from scratch – at least two kinds of tamales, and mole, of course." He

developed his *mole* recipe – adapted from various recipes from his personal cookbook library – for a cooking class he taught at Central Market. "But I also cook from Susana Trilling's book and always look to Diana Kennedy for the most authentic recipes." His eager guests are in charge of the beans, rice, tortillas, and beverages.

Día de los Muertos is a celebration near and dear to Marisela Godinez's heart. The chef from El Mesón fondly remembers how her mother celebrated this holiday while she was growing up in Naucalpan, just outside Mexico City. "Mom became an orphan at the age of 6," she recalls, "so she always set up an altar in honor of her parents. Preparations began by taking my sisters and me to the market to buy the flowers, pan de muerto, sugar skulls, candles, and the ingredients for her mole. ... I recall the smells of the market vividly: incense, marigolds, and dried chiles. It's a season that always brings me great memories," she confides. "My mother's altar was very simple, just candles, a glass of water, a rosary, and lots of marigolds; their smell impregnated the house.

She would set *cocoles* [anise-flavored pastries] for my grandpa, and for her mother she always made calabaza en tacha [pumpkin cooked in piloncillo syrup] and dulce de camote [candied sweet potato]." Godinez sets altars every year, passing the tradition down to her own children, only now her altar is dedicated to her recently deceased mother. Two things are constant on her simple altar: plenty of marigolds and coxcombs and pan de muerto from Panadería Chuy ("It's the tastiest and the prettiest," she says). After seeing my presentation at Mexic-Arte last year, she wanted to set up a more elaborate Oaxaca-style ofrenda this year. "I think this is one of the reasons non-Mexicans have embraced this celebration," she says. "Even though death is a sober, serious matter, Días de los Muertos is a beautiful, colorful, artistic celebration that is quite attractive." Her altar will be on display at the restaurant, and she'll be featuring her moles (including her mother's prized mole rojo), as well as the candied pumpkin and sweet potato dishes that remind her of her mom. Make sure to stop by for a taste of these Day of the Dead dishes, and soak up some tradition.

# How classic horror movies made misfits out of these rockers BY MARC SAVLOV

"Bonfires burning bright, pumpkin faces in the night, I remember Halloween."

- Misfits' "Halloween"

There are a lot of us out there this time of year – the monster kids. We've been biding our time, waiting for the dark carnival to arrive in the October country of this near-perfect autumn. Waiting for it to blow chills into the air, accompanied by the crackling susurrations of dead leaves dancing across dusty back roads and the hollow castanet rattle of boneyard creepers. It's going to be a black Sunday indeed, especially if you're hanging around Emo's Downtown.

For the second time in as many years, long-running Misfits tribute outfit Children in Heat is teaming up with horror-movie-influenced, femme-fatale cabaret/performance troupe Dolls From the Crypt (just don't call them "burlesque"; they've got killer smiles and matching blades, and they won't hesitate to unsheathe either) for their annual Halloween night horror-a-go-go.

Formed from the decade-old ashes of Chepo Peña's annual Gomez-as-Misfits Halloween gigs, Children in Heat reincarnate Walk Among Us-era 'Fits, pre-Samhain and aeons before "Twist of Cain" and "box of kitty litter." Add crypt-keeper Lisa "Bunny Voodoo" Stahlhut's devil dolls, horror vixens, and final girls in deep-red stiletto heels; Children in Heat bassist Craig Merritt's Pallbearer Press horror movie T-shirt design side project; stir up a swirling, howling mosh pit; boil the blood; and, well, all hell breaks loose.

It's all deep-dark-rooted in a shared, overlapping love of horror movies, Misfits, and the season of the witch.

For Voodoo, a San Diego transplant with Bettie Page bangs, a pale white feline face, and a marrow-deep appreciation of the cinematic art of fear, the skeleton key to the metaphorical ossuary originated in a latchkey youth spent glued to late-

night horrorthons – a TV casualty who dug spinal remains. But she's not just Elsa Lanchester and screaming mimis: "I loved *The Signal* and *End of the Line*, a really low-budget film that gets it just right and some of the more recent, sort-of horror comedies like *Black Sheep* and *Severance*."

As for Children in Heat's resident Danzig (aka former Fabulous Thunderbird/current Flash Boy/Austin icon Nick Curran): "The first Misfits album I owned was *Legacy of Brutality*, and I'd listen to that every day, all day, until I knew every word. I've always loved the fact that the Misfits were so, like, pop songs and pretty-sounding, but then you'd listen to the lyrics, and it was like ... whoa!"

Granted, it's not just an Austin thing, although it does sometimes seem like every day is Halloween here in Spook City, USA, Danzig's much-maligned feline foray be damned. We dig Mario Bava year-round, we can name-check Ardeth Bay, and we've got Vincent Price's autograph sitting atop our moldering stack of Sixties-era Famous Monsters of Filmlands. We can tell Vampira from Elvira, and we like Vampira better. We don't just sport the Crimson Ghost on our biceps and gear; we've seen it (Republic Pictures, 1946).

"Speaking of Halloween," says Voodoo, "I miss trick-ortreating. Remember when people literally tried to scare the shit out of kids? They don't do that anymore."

"I used to love to go out in the dark and stay out late," adds Curran, unsurprisingly. "When I was 10, I went as Freddy Krueger, and I actually made a glove with knife blades, as real as possible. I used to go all-out."

"That's a good point," notes Voodoo. "Back in the day, you made your own costume, if you were creative and didn't go to Kmart to buy one of the pre-made costumes. And that's the thing that's cool about Halloween. It makes you stay young. Which is the secret to life, really, whether you do it through music or movies or whatever. You've got to embrace the



things that most people are scared of because otherwise you're not really living life."

That's, like, 6 feet deep, Voodoo. Kids in the crypt: They're coming to get you, Barbara Steele.

Children in Heat and Dolls From the Crypt play Emo's Ghouls Night Out on Sunday, Oct. 31. Doors open at 9pm. For more about Craig Merritt's classic horror-themed Pallbearer Press. see www.pallbearerpress.com.

Let's come right out and say it upfront: Gareth Edwards' Monsters is the best monster movie of the millennium (thus far). Seriously. Don't believe it? Still rolling over that four-leaf-Cloverfield? Stuck in District 9? We loved those, too, but for our money, the Brit-helmed Monsters trounces Matt Reeves' New York escapade and Neill Blomkamp's South African bug-fuck by sheer virtue of directorial pluck (it's Edwards' first film out of the gate) and producerial luck (rumored budget: \$15,000!). Add to that the fact that it's not just a monster movie but also a road movie/love story starring former Austinite Scoot McNairy alongside his now-wife Whitney Able and a smart, instinctual nonscript, and you've got something wholly unique yet strangely, strikingly akin to The African Queen meets Yog, Monster From Space.

McNairy plays a jaded photojournalist saddled with the unexpected and unwanted responsibility of getting his boss' daughter (Able) back home where she belongs. Unfortunately, they're both in "the infected zone" in Mexico, a no-man's-land so named because it's where, six years prior to the start of the action, a NASA probe returned to Earth with its own unexpected cargo: four-story-tall, bioluminescent squid-aliens who have, in the interim, spawned themselves across a huge swath of Mexico and, appropriately enough, Texas (where everything except the budget is, you know, bigger).

We spoke to Edwards about his own backstory, how he conceived this expertly nuanced exercise in cephalopod terror/pathos, and, most importantly, his original childhood dream job and why lies are, at least sometimes, good things indeed.

**Austin Chronicle:** Monsters was picked up for distribution almost overnight, during South by Southwest 2010, right?

Gareth Edwards: Right, it all happened that first night. From now on I'll divide my life into two parts: life before Austin and life after Austin. It all changed for me at that Festival, and it's been crazy ever since.

AC: And Monsters was your first film.

AC: Was that the master plan? Make a monster movie, take it to Austin, and become a lauded director in one fell swoop?

**GE:** Actually what I wanted to do when I was a kid was join the Rebel Alliance and blow up the Death Star. And then my mom explained to me that it was a lie created by people called "filmmakers," and so I thought the second best option would be to be one of those "filmmakers," and I'll tell lies as well. So I grew up since I was tiny wanting to be a film director. I went to film school, made short films, all those sort of things, and I found that I was so

used to playing around with my dad's video camera and making stupid little films in a day that when I learned how to do filmmaking properly I got very frustrated with it. It was all about budgets and bureaucracy and not so much about storytelling. At the time, around 1993, my flatmate was studying this brand-new thing called computer animation, and I thought that, you know, this is going to be a really powerful tool, like a camera, for filmmakers, and I had better learn how to use it. The rationale was that in the event that nobody ever gave me a chance to make a movie, it looked like with this stuff you could almost possibly go and make a film on your own and then add all the production value in on the computer. So I ended up with a career in visual effects after having learned all that stuff, but with the intention always of learning it so that I could make a movie.

AC: Focus is key. And here it is 17 years later, and you've got one hell of a sci-fi, road-trip romance on your hands. Brilliant!

GE: Yeah, well, I just kept putting it off and putting it off and making excuses as to why I wasn't going to make a movie until next year. AC: What was the deciding factor? Were you pushed, or did you leap?

GE: I think you reach a point where you're going to be more depressed having never tried to do it than having done it and completely failed. I must've hit that point a couple of years ago, because I abandoned my career, spent all the money I had trying to get it off the ground, and ... here we are. It was worth it, but it was quite scary for a while.

**AC**: Scary how?

**GE:** Just abandoning my visual-effects career. I built up a load of clients, kind of working from my bedroom for the BBC, Discovery Channel, people like that. It was going on really well, and I was pretty comfortable.

earning good money, but it became a situation where clients would ring me up and I'd keep taking the jobs, because you worry the day you say no is the day they go and find someone else, and you never work

again. It's that freelance fear. I was scared to turn work down. Once you turn work down, people stop calling. I used to get about a call a week to do graphics, and I haven't had a call now in about a year. But I think that part of my life is over now.

**AC:** Monsters was largely improvised, correct? **GE:** The film got green-lit without any script or story at all. It was literally, "I want to set a monster movie years after it normally ends, when everything's normal, and I think you could do it very cheaply if we add the visual effects in the background." That was the pitch. I showed [the producers] some shorts and television work I had done, and I think they thought, "Well, even if this goes horribly wrong, it's so

little money that it's worth the risk."

The story, in my mind, was always going to be about some sort of journey, a road movie, and it would be one of the characters who we were following. I suggested quite a few different options to the producers and eventually they were most keen on having a male and female lead. I'm not a big fan of love stories in films because I find them a bit cheesy, but whether you like it or not, if you have a male and a female as the leads, then it becomes a love story. There's no way around it. Lost in Translation is a great example of that.

So I had that rough premise, and I was thinking about actors when the production company, Vertigo Films, suggested Scoot McNairy, who was in another one of their films, In Search of a Midnight Kiss. I talked to Scoot and explained that what I really wanted was a genuine, reallife couple at the heart of the film, because the chemistry is so important between the two characters. And he said, "Well, my girlfriend's an actress" and sent me some pictures. She looked stunning, so much so that it actually put me off a bit because, you know, I wanted the film to have a very gritty, very real look to it. And then I met Whitney, and she was so downto-earth that I knew it could work.

AC: Did you at least have a script or outline for Scoot and Whitney to work from?

**GE:** What I did was print the physical things that happen to these two characters on their journey in black ink, and then in blue ink I printed the emotions and things that they reveal or that we learn about them. Whenever we were at a location, we'd have a little paragraph describing what the scene was, in terms of what had to happen, but then we would pick a blue page and try and figure out what we could get into the scene emotionally or what we could reveal. It was very ad-libbed. Everybody in the film apart from [McNairy and Able] were pretty much nonactors. I think you can get great performances out of them so long as you don't tell them how to behave, so that their characters

react the way they personally would react. It was so random what these nonactors were doing and saying that Scoot and Whitney were constantly having to dance around them to compensate. It was very

obvious early on that the idea of having a script script was not going to happen.

Monsters opens in Austin on Oct. 29.

**AC**: That's pretty amazing in light of the fact that there's not a missed beat in the entire film.

GE: I think it's very hard to fake those moments where someone is trying to think what to say next and they're not articulating it very well. That's how real life is to me. That's how I talk. Scripts often can be so polished and perfect that it might be great dialogue but it's not how people speak in real life. I was really keen to capture that because the real and normal world is brought into direct contrast with this insane fact that there's these big aliens in the background. It just makes it all that much more believable.

I didn't see it coming. All those naughty photos of Glee cast members Dianna Agron, Lea Michele (pictured right, far more chastely), and Cory Monteith published in the November issue of GQ magazine were all over entertainment television and the Internet last week. According to PTC President Tim Winter, in an official press release: "It is disturbing that *GQ*, which is explicitly written for adult men. is sexualizing the actresses who play high school-aged characters on Glee in this way. It borders on pedophilia. Sadly, this is just the latest example of the overt sexualization of young girls in entertainment. ...

"By authorizing this kind of near-pornographic display, the creators of the program have established their intentions on the show's direction. And it isn't good for families."

"Overt sexualization of women"? Yes. This is an old issue and one that I could get on board with until the PTC then argued that the photo shoot establishes the creators' "intentions on the show's direction." Really? That leap in logic is as strained as saying that I want to open a brewery because I drink a beer.

Apparently, recent episodes of the "family friendly" series have put conservative media watchers on edge, including the Madonna episode, the tribute to Britney Spears, and Tuesday's Rocky Horror Picture Show homage. Glee airs early in prime time, when children are supposedly most likely to watch. But honestly, hasn't the PTC or any related

organization heard of DVRs, Hulu, or streaming Internet video, all of which make it possible to watch TV at any time of the day? Prime time is nearly a misnomer now, as viewers are no longer chained to the set to watch their favorite shows at an assigned time. Maybe the PTC took him seriously when Glee series

creator Ryan Murphy quipped (according to PTC press materials):

"It's tough to get that sexual point of view across on television. Hopefully I have made it possible for somebody on broadcast television to do a rear-entry scene in three years. Maybe that will be my legacy."

Murphy's tongue must have made an enormous dent in his cheek when he said that, don't you think?

Instead of creating dust storms, I wish the PTC would use its resources to tell its followers what it recommends and why. Perhaps the PTC could widen its scope. TV isn't the only means of entertainment. And when something so horrendously offends PTC members, they can do what the rest of us do: turn off the set, put down the magazine, or walk out of the theatre and do something else.

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

# All Down the Line

Stones on film and, finally, DVD

Falling between this year's crossfire PR hurricane for 1972 Rolling Stones magnum opus reboot, Exile on Main St., and now Keith Richards' sensational autobiography Life - published Monday - the Screen's Greatest Rock & Roll Band also reissued another defining time capsule, cinematic and perhaps otherwise.

Nearly a month before its DVD release, and for one night only - Thursday, Sept. 16, 7:30pm - Ladies & Gentlemen the Rolling Stones returned to numerous big screens up and down Austin's I-35 corridor. Groupies were in surprisingly short supply, but a couple were rounded up, and just as my best friend and I had done not so many year's after the film's brief and limited theatrical release in 1974, we made the scene. We weren't alone. The Metropolitan didn't exactly sell out, but to a closet full of moths, the flame always draws.

From 1966's Charlie Is My Darling, whose one-hour doc of a period Rolling Stones tour played at the original Alamo Drafthouse's Music Mondays in an honest to goodness celluloid print, all the way to Martin Scorsese's Shine a Light in 2008 - and with stops everywhere from Jean-Luc Godard's Sympathy for the Devil to Rock History 101 Gimme Shelter - the Stones on film might as well date back to the very dawn of the medium itself. Rolling Stones Live at the Max was upgraded to DVD, but concert videos of the Voodoo Lounge and Bridges to Babylon tours in '95 and '98 cede shelf space to new millennial 4-DVD box sets Four Flicks and The Biggest Bang, which includes the UK legends' unbelievable 2006 Zilker Park performance.

None of it touches Ladies & Gentlemen the Rolling Stones. Nor for that matter can most of those titles man up to another concert film that unlike its bookend here was at least issued on VHS (and my LaserDisc!) and, while also generally forgotten, makes its debut on DVD next week. In both beats the blackest soul of the Rolling Stones.

The Mick Jagger of Ladies & Gentlemen the **Rolling Stones animates** the Mick Jagger of our collective imagination. **Crown him Rock Star No.** 6 - after Presley and four Beatles. First frontman.

#### Fever in the Funk House Now

Glitter glued to the corner of his eyes and on his forehead, pinky ring protruding and a blue denim shirt over his chestless white jumpsuit and red sash belt, the Mick Jagger of Ladies & Gentlemen the Rolling Stones animates the Mick Jagger of our collective imagination. Crown him Rock Star No. 6 - after Presley and four Beatles. First frontman.


Rock Star No. 7 - Lucky Seven - Keith Richards enters in heeled boots and a scarf, shag haircut that launched a whole human subspecies of bad boys. Charlie Watts, in his cream puff conga shirt, looks like an ice cream sundae. That the film, culled from four shows in Fort Worth and Houston, June 1972, offers absolutely no costume continuity - stage clothes changing from song to song – lends the whole venture a Fellini-esque haze: 81/2 rock stars and their many-colored clown suits!

Before football stadiums and stage lengths to match, when guitars were still connected to amplifiers by what looks like curly headphone chords, the Rolling Stones clustered around the drum kit. Mick Taylor stands mostly motionless downstage left of Jagger, unleashing piercing leads like a one-man "Proud Mary" pumping "tane" down in New Orleans. "Brown Sugar" and "Bitch" open by kicking in the latter's proverbial stall.

"Gimme Shelter" goes from wobbly folker to avalanche in a minute flat. Taylor slick as ice on his Les Paul Sunburst as Jagger strips down to his tank top and package-enhancing trousers, hand on his hip in classic Jagger pose. The song's author, Richards, keeps playing its red light district rhythm like a schoolboy scooping jacks. Given such exposed roots, country bumpkin "Dead Flowers" next makes perfect sense, especially given the rare illustration of Richards' once tangy tenor on harmonies at the same mic with Jagger. Glimmer twins forever, "Sweethearts Together."

Jagger clearly relishes the country harmonies, and Richards in his white satin shirt and two-tone mop top pushes it all forward. Turns out to be warm-up for the guitarist's Exile solo, "Happy," Richards' semi-skeletal, jack-o'lantern grin at the mic, with his mouthful of junkie teeth rot, is mesmerizing in his anti-hero charisma. When he delivers the line, "Never wanna be like papa," and Jagger's head bobs into the frame while both cats youl the rejoinder, "Working for the boss every night and day," it's rock & roll incarnate in one single frame.

"Sorry that you didn't get to see Stevie Wonder, but we'll do our best," offers Jagger afterward, the '72 tour opener having slept in apparently.



Suddenly, Jagger's in a black diamond jumpsuit and white sash as Richards' rolling riffs begin undulating "Tumbling Dice" and Watts beats cardio. Jagger mouthing the riff at the end and looking as if he was just fed a roofie apparently made it past the band's censors.

"Thank you," smiles the singer. "We'd like to do a little blues for you, I think, yes." Then whispering: "We're gonna do a little blues for you." He reconsiders.

"Can you hear in the back? Can you hear in the back at all? Can you hear anything?'

The red glow of Robert Johnson's "Love in Vain," covered by the band on 1969's Let It Bleed, rusts immediately on Richards' sole guitar tiptoeing through the opening strangle of blues. Taylor's slide solo, as perfect as his young, painted, John Singer Sargent profile as he looks down at his guitar, downshifts the tune into its true whorehouse hues, its slow, sweaty embrace evoking everything carnal in man and music. Jagger's eyelids get heavy, Keith and Charlie lock into a death row strum and bang, and Taylor continues plugging deeper and deeper into the song's electric confessional.

In an act of mercy afterward, Jagger announces the onset of acoustic guitars on this "quiet Sunday afternoon."

"Why aren't you in church anyway?" he wonders, Watts' rimshot an entire drum solo in lesser hands.

The steel-string rain barrel of "Sweet Virginia" runneth over with Jagger clapping and intoning its hillbilly hippie lament, cracker country as imitated by drug-hoovering acolytes. A two-shot of Jagger singing and Richards sitting strumming behind him, the guitarist's harmony as piercing as smelling salts, and Lubbock landmark Bobby Keys, stepping to the mic with his saxophone lacquer, encores on a triumphant flourish from Richards at the finale.

Segued into said ruffian's Fender call-to-worship, "You Can't Always Get What You Want," his satin blouse open to the waist, the dark



prince of rock & roll plays to a higher audience when his eyes roll back into his head. Richards then gazes at Jagger as the frontman sings to the congregation with a look that's impossible to decode, his descending guitar spiral a ringworm hook. Again their harmonies, Mick and Keith at the mic together, define their genre at a glance. Mick Taylor, in a sequined Stones tongue wife-beater, looks like a choirgirl next to the two bad-boy missionaries.

"We're gonna turn the heat up," announces Jagger with a merciless look in his eye, to which the band responds by climbing aboard "All Down the Line" and barreling down the Union Pacific tracks.


Jagger in his white jumpsuit and red sash, looking like the hood ornament off one of Richards' crashed Bentleys, and his co-writer honking out freight-liner riffs as Taylor flies his steel slide hang glider lead the band in full lunge, quick-edit visuals quoted ever since. The singer's compact stage boogie speaks to the music originating within him rather than his reaction to it. Shifting into "Midnight Rambler" next, a nasty piece of blues spook-'n'-slash opening the cell blocks to every 12-bar thief, pimp, and murderer who ever wreaked havoc on a full moon Saturday night, the band taps into its pact with the devil - worth every bleeding penny. This is where Jagger delivers the song's pulsed bump and grind on his hands and knees, lashing the stage with his sash, every post R&B imitator having paled since. At the 60-minute mark, it's the volcanic peak. Richards takes a swig of Jack Daniels in celebration.

Chuck Berry gets a beating on the rough and tumble assault of "Bye Bye Johnny," Jagger donning a cowboy hat, which is nothing compared to his headstand during "Rip This Joint." Then hits "Jumpin' Jack Flash," Richards and Watts the twin pistons driving its lashing downpour. The bandleader -Richards - shot from behind Watts, offers a picture of youthful obsession. Quick cuts and close-ups of the final number, "Street Fighting Man," Jagger convulsing and Richards sawing, fire a heart shot at Nixon's Vietnamravaged America.



A Hal Ashby Film The Rolling Stones: Let's Spend the Night Together

Caravanning with the band onstage, the big daddy of modern concert promoters, the late Bill Graham, slices around both Keith Richards and Ron Wood - in their black leather jackets sucking down their ever present cigarettes - to the stage front behind the curtain. Charlie Watts takes his seat, while the pianists - Austin's Ian McLagan and sixth Stone Ian Stewart - boogiewoogie back-to-back as Graham snaps his fingers to their bounce.

"Thank you so much for waiting," yells Graham out front, and believe me, you had to wait forever to get the Stones onstage that tour. "Would you welcome please the Rolling Stones!"

A decade removed from Ladies & Gentlemen the Rolling Stones, which in rock & roll years might be double or triple that, the World's Greatest Rock & Roll Band is light years rougher and tougher at the dawn of the Reagan era, Jagger now a jersey-and-kneepads-wearing football stadium Olympian and Richards the ever feral, now heroin survivor and mascara thug, Woody his understudy. Watts and Bill Wyman thump it all together as the rude, buzzing riffs of "Under My Thumb" pump out onto a Roman coliseum of fans. Cameras pan a 180 behind the band onstage and then lift off above the hills overlooking Tempe, Ariz.'s Sun Devil Stadium.

Instead of the lead/rhythm dynamic of the Mick Taylor years, Richards and Wood practice the ancient art of guitar weaving, its mainstay cranking out chunky Chuck Berry and his protégé wrapping it in barbwire. An early shot in Let's Spend the Night Together finds Jagger prancing to the audience, while Woody holds high ground upstage and Richards grinds the chopping sway of "Thumb" in the foreground. The sound mix, Richards' chanka-chanka in the left channel and Wood's pink tones in the right, begs for ever-higher volumes. Richards then picking out the film's title song at twice its original tempo rouses the same as a shot of the band's original epicenter, Ian Stewart, rolling and tumbling on the keys as his silver/ pepper hair shifts like snow. These were the cocaine tempo years – for all rock, roll – but the underlying soul can't be quashed.



and close-ups by following the music. This is an action film disguised as a documentary.

Backstage the boys do their hair - aided by the band's blondes, Jo Wood and Jerry Hall – and material off the band's then-current album, Tattoo You, slam-bams 40,000-65,000 on "Neighbors" and cruises a stretch Cadillac on "Black Limousine." Some Girls' Temptations cover, "Just My Imagination (Running Away With Me)," was a highlight of the LP trek and of its truncated tour souvenir, Still Life (American Concert 1981) - so when Jagger straps on a cherry-red Gibson SG and Richards takes hold of the song's loping backbone, Watts lays in a beat to live life by. Look for the bit where Richards misses his harmonic cue, runs to and overshoots the mic, then has to put his cigarette down onstage to sing, only to have Woody bend down to pick it up a second later. Richards' hound dog harmonies bark as casual as his black vest and tie. Jazz man Ernie Watts subs for Bobby Keys.

Another 1981 set snort was a two-minute rip through Eddie Cochran imprint "20 Flight

"I've been shit, shat, and shit on - shedoobie, shedoobie, shedoobie," snarks the singer.

Jagger delivers "Shattered" even faster than 'Rip This Joint" in the previous film, Let's Spend the Night Together delivering 25 songs to Ladies & Gentlemen's 15 while needing only 10 additional minutes and 90 overall to do so. Here, Richards and Wood share a mic, and Mick's gone wireless. Better still, the director of this cinema verité - 1970s auteur of Harold and Maude, The Last Detail, Shampoo, Bound for Glory, Coming Home, Being There, and more no doubt raised twice the budget of the band's previous concert film, used double the cameras (20), and matches the Rolling Stones in Godgiven chops. Ashby's onstage lenses prowl the stage voyeuristically, catching Jagger and Richards hunched down and squaring off from just over the left shoulder of Ian McLagan. His camera lingers in opposition to modern music film technique, Ashby balancing long shots Rock," Richards manhandling his Fender as the Stones rock back on their rockabilly roots, the guitarist jolting out a street beating. Watts pulls the rip chord on an even faster tempo for Emotional Rescue's "Let Me Go," which makes "All Down the Line" sound like it's standing still. "Whoa," mouths Richards to Woods, surfing atop the beat as Jagger bounds out into the audience.

Before the band has a heart attack, Jagger dons a hat and everyone slows for "Time Is On My Side." Ashby cuts in vintage photos of the band as children, plus television footage from the Stones' reverse Dorian Gray portrait (the band ages, but the picture keeps getting facelifts) and other visual memorabilia of the quintet's then barely 20-year career. Ed Sullivan footage of the band in all its Brian Jones glory makes the song even more poignant prior to Richards' thank-you to Jagger for carrying the Stones through his drug "experiment," Some

Girls' "Beast of Burden," which slides into a babymaking rhythm. Richards' cigarette and supplication to the audience during it assumes a postcoital glow.

'Waiting on a Friend" receives a dusky reading from Jagger, while a manhandling jungle beat on Smokey Robinson's "Going to a Go-Go" soundtracks a time-lapsed stage erection of the juggernaut's indoor show, begun here on "You Can't Always Get What You Want," Richards' shrugging riffs played in a shirt torn from the tatters of "Shattered." His entire interpretive dance and harmonic yowl, accented by Woods' shred whispering, glimpses Richards' inner muse.

"On bass, 39 and holding, Bill Wyman," cracks Jagger during the band introductions, and in them you can see his master of ceremonies of the past 20 years: glib and slightly scripted but completely in the moment. In Richards' repaired grill and nicotine-scarred vox resides the band's ever-growling lion of Judah ("Little T&A"). Complimenting him always, Charlie Watts' atomic clock timekeeping outdistances the Maya calendar.


Glimpse the director himself, shirtless backstage on a couch, during the montage roll of "She's So Cold," Richards hammering out its Chuck Berry cop like a stonemason. "All Down the Line" spins at 78 rpm, but the stomping garage tear of "Hang Fire" burns rubber. "Miss You" ends the adrenal pace as the whole band limbos the Studio 54 strut in unison. Bathed in red, Richards demonizes the groove, while Jagger's scowl opening "Let It Bleed" uncorks the end-run of hits: "Start Me Up," "Honky Tonk Women" (featuring Shirley Watts in the dance hall girl chorus and Jagger and Richards back at the mic together), "Brown Sugar" and its original saxophonist Bobby Keys, "JJ Flash" (as the band notes the song on its set-lists), and finally, "Satisfaction."

The editing, stolen close-ups, and mini montages (Jagger's bows), not to mention the ceiling shot of falling balloons and lightsup victory spike of "Satisfaction," are easy to take for granted in the closing minutes of Let's Spend the Night Together, but a lifetime of concert films since prove this the work of a master director, right down to the end credit fireworks and explosions accompanying Jimi Hendrix's "Star-Spangled Banner."



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


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
#### **LIZ PHAIR** Funstyle (Rocket Science)

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#### **NEIL YOUNG**

#### Le Noise (Reprise)

From its first chord hit and sustained, distortion displacing air, *Le Noise* courts Neil Young's classic platters. "I feel your love," begins the forever Bay Area Canadian. "I feel your strong love. I feel the patience of unconditional love." Good thing, too, since we the planet gave that up beginning a half-century ago now. "I feel your faith in me." Sixty-five years Young on Nov. 12, don't-fuck-with-me Scorpio here takes that powerfully unbroken circle and, as with opener "Walk With Me," strips down to his axes and amps while letting producer shaman



Daniel Lanois bind, lash, and even drive a sonic spike or two through the naked song king detailed within. Young's act of confession is our saving grace. The decade from 2000 to 2010 marks the same peaks and valleys in his catalog as in U.S. foreign policy: Silver & Gold (2000), Are You Passionate? ('02), Greendale ('03), Prairie Wind ('05), Living With War ('06), Chrome Dreams II ('07), Fork in the Road ('09). Le Noise ranks with the best of them (Prairie Wind), with a wise man's resignation rather than a patriot's indignation (Are You Passionate?, Greendale, Living With War). "Walk With Me" cuts a lyrical path of universality, but heard as Young's acknowledgement of communal dependence, its abrasive convocation sets the scene like open heart surgery. Successor "Sign of Love" ("take it as a sign of love when the winds of fate keep blowing") in guitar tones alone hearkens to Young's most recent Crazy Horse efforts, 1996's Broken Arrow and its live spin-off the following year, Year of the Horse, documented to film by Jim Jarmusch. Even then it's "Love and War," batting cleanup, that lifts Le Noise past the fences. Echoing the steely freedom fighter of 1989's five-star Freedom, with a riff cousin to "My My, Hey Hey (Out of the Blue)" from Freedom's predecessor a decade before, 1979's Rust Never Sleeps, "Love and War" catalogs Young the peacenik at every rung of his comet's tail career in that ageless tenor of vulnerability. "It's an Angry World" falls prey to its own homespun simplicity outside a Redwood-sized electric buzz, but it sets up the twin peak to "Love and War": pharmaceutical tell-all "The Hitchhiker," in which Young thumbs his way through the middle chapter of sex, drugs, and rock & roll only to end up back home with his children and "my faithful wife." Fear and Loathing in Topanga Canyon. That backs into penultimate track "Peaceful Valley Boulevard," a modern haunt evoking Young's own "Cortez the Killer." The guitarist's acoustic picking alone puts "Peaceful Valley Boulevard" in his Halls of Montezuma. Neil Young, Mr. (R)October.

# **SUPERCHUNK** *Majesty Shredding* (Merge)

Of all the 1990s acts reconvening for albums, none picks up where it left off quite like Superchunk does on its first LP in



close to 10 years. The Chapel Hill quartet's label, founded by singer/guitarist Mac McCaughan and bassist Laura Ballance, is now home to heavies like the Arcade Fire and Spoon, but Superchunk was its original anthem band, and Majesty Shredding doesn't let up over 11 songs. "Mister, keep your memories" opens "My Gap Feels Weird," and the subtext is clear: Superchunk is older, but there's no whiff of nostalgia. "Crossed Wires," "Rosemarie," and "Slow Drip" vary in tempo, but that bashing pop-punk stance holds up each, and McCaughan, voice still the same after 15 years, does his best not to sound jaded. Quite the opposite: Superchunk sounds revitalized. Put this against 1994's acclaimed Foolish or 2001's Here's to Shutting Up, and it stands on its own, a reminder that Superchunk is still doing it better than most new bands today.

#### GORILLAZ

#### Frank Erwin Center, Oct. 22

For the last decade, Gorillaz existed only in two dimensions: an illustrated supergroup -Murdoc, Russel, 2D, and Noodle - scripted by comic strip hero and Tank Girl visionary Jamie Hewlett, and a real-life, revolving-door musical equivalent led by Damon Albarn. On Friday night at a sold out Frank Erwin Center, the Blur frontman took them both 3-D. Over the course of two hours, Albarn served as master of ceremonies, backing vocalist ("Dirty Harry"), piano balladeer ("El Mañana"), and perennial rockstar showman, bounding about the stage in spastic, joyous tantrums even more animated than his cartoon counterparts. From the massive LED screen backdrop, Snoop Dogg opened with "Welcome to the World of the Plastic Beach," a virtual preamble to the grand, interactive spectacle that followed. Gorillaz delivered Brit-pop theatre with a cast that included the eight-member Hypnotic Brass Ensemble and, for the instrumental suite that opened

"White Flag," the American Syrian Orchestra. That's not counting the sevenpiece house band, anchored by the nautical command and stadium showmanship of the Clash's guitarist Mick Jones and bassist Paul Simonon, or the parade of special guests, including Rosie Wilson ("Dare") and Little Dragon's Yukimi Nagano (1950s-style twee duet "To Binge"). that breathed considerable life into the group's third pirate fantasy, Plastic Beach, which was accounted for almost in its entirety. De La Soul devoured the frosted delight of "Superfast Jellyfish" and capitalized in the five-song encore with standout "Feel Good Inc.," while London's Kano and Bashy followed suit with alternate verses for the Gorillaz's breakthrough "Clint Eastwood." The real treat proved the resurrection of eternal Midnight Mover Bobby Womack, who testified with scared intensity in the Bootie Brown-assisted "Stylo." For all parties involved. Gorillaz delivered a massive coming-out party, Albarn's new world order for these "Demon Days." - Austin Powell

# CHARLES LLOYD QUARTET

As the title of Charles Lloyd's 14th ECM release implies, *Mirror* largely reflects back. Revisiting a handful of tunes he's previously recorded for the label over the past two decades, the Golden State saxophonist and



composer offers fresh interpretations of the title track, "Go Down Moses," "Desolation Sound," "The Water Is Wide," and "Lift Every Voice and Sing" with his new quartet featuring

superstar Jason Moran on piano and astonishing drummer Eric Harland (both Houston natives) and bassist Reuben Rogers. Lloyd continues channeling the restless spirit of John Coltrane, but he also unabashedly recreates the yearning sound of Trane's gentle side. A pair of Thelonious Monk ballads are exquisitely covered, but the biggest surprise comes from Lloyd's extrapolation of Brian Wilson's "Caroline, No." Two new originals from this ageless giant conclude a beautifully contemplative set that shines like a polished mirror.

#### **LEAD STORY**

David Winkelman, 48, was arrested in Davenport, Iowa, in September on a misdemeanor warrant and still sporting his infamous tattoo. In late 2000, Winkelman, reacting to a radio contest, had his forehead inked with the logo of radio station KORB, "93 Rock," because he had heard on-air personalities offer \$100,000 to anyone who would do it. Winkelman had the tattoo done before verifying, however, and the disc jockeys later informed him that the contest was a joke. Winkelman filed a lawsuit against the station, but it was dismissed. Ten years later, the "93 Rock" format has expired, but Winkelman's forehead remains prominently tattooed.

#### **GOVERNMENT IN ACTION!**

For most of 2010, California's dysfunctional Legislature could find no acceptable tax increases or spending cuts to keep the state from going broke, and only in October did it manage to cobble together enough pie-in-the-sky bookkeeping tricks to create the illusion of a balanced budget. Nonetheless, the Legislature has been busy. It created a Motorcycle Awareness Month and a Cuss Free Week, considered changing the official state rock, and made it illegal to use non-Californian cows in the state's marketing materials - a decision that entailed five committee votes and exhausted eight legislative analyses, according to a September Wall Street Journal report.

At a U.S. Senate committee hearing in September, the Securities and Exchange Commission's head of enforcement admitted that not a single agency staff member had been fired or demoted over the multiple missed signals handed to them in cases 11 years before the Ponzi schemes of Bernard Madoff and R. Allen Stanford were uncovered. Sen. Christopher Dodd of Connecticut said it appeared that "one side of the agency was screaming that there was a fire," but the other side of the agency demurred because putting it out would have been hard work.

The Prudential Financial corporation, holder of life insurance contracts on U.S. troops, modified the standard payout method in 1999 by encouraging beneficiaries to take not lump sums but "checking accounts" on which survivors could draw down funds "as needed." Though this arrangement obviously benefited Prudential, it was unclear to *Bloomberg* news (which broke the story in September 2010) why the Department of Veterans Affairs had endorsed it – implicitly in 1999 and then in writing in September 2009.



TURNOUT IN Q DROVES Last week, we all wore purple and stood up to bullying. The recent slew of gay teen suicides has certainly put sweet human faces on what, for many of us, had been relegated to the realm of the intangible, the unthinkable. This week, we have the opportunity to stand up in a different sort of way. It's not as glamorous, it's not as tear-jerking, it's not as obvious, but hey, you do get a sticker. I vote. I voted. In fact, I voted early (and you can too until Friday evening). I vote every time I have the opportunity. Does that make me special? No. that makes me an ordinary citizen expressing my rights and performing my civic duty. Despite the many news bites that make it seem we are teeter

ing on the edge of monocratic/theocratic redundancy; despite the slow, frustrating flow of policy: despite the white noise of too many voices (sometimes not enough), I believe in American democracy. I know: corny. Naive. Deluded. But I'll say it again: I believe in American democracy, And democracy is ugly. It's messy and often

dissatisfying. This past week, I had the honor of sitting on a jury impaneling. I found the experience to

be simultaneously tedious and invigoratingly enlightening. I did not get selected, but what I did get was a glimpse into the methodical yet labyrinthine systems we have in place to sort out the ugly fact that many opinions make us, that many belief systems constitute us, and sometimes they contradict. Sometimes one belief holds many others back, and it is inherently unfair in that moment. And struggle is necessary. And change is inevitable. And that's what I sign on for every time I cast a ballot. Am I thrilled to cast my vote for Bill White? In some ways, no - I am disappointed by his takes on gay marriage and the death penalty, for example. In other ways, I am very excited.

He's a policy wonk (swoon) who actually has a chance of defeating Rick Perry, which means we all have a chance of defeating Rick Perry - who has been heinous for the state of Texas. And it's my right to make that choice. I make that choice despite noise that says my vote doesn't make a difference. The strategy to make some person or group feel so powerless as to make

them want to not vote is just that: a strategy. And it's bullying. Please don't fall for it.



**Mustang Island State Park** preserves five miles of primitive beach. The rolling waves of the Gulf of Mexico provide background music and entertainment for guests. Though most visitors come

for the surf and sun, the park includes important ecosystems that are rarely seen.

The primary activity in the park is frolicking in the waves, but fishing runs a close second. Park rangers say that the waters can be as productive as any fishing spot along the coast, particularly when schools of redfish, black drum, flounder, and speckled trout are running.

While surf fishing is popular, most anglers head out to the end of the two jetties made of huge red granite blocks at the north end of the



park's beach. In the 1980s the state cut Fish Pass across the island to connect the Corpus Christi Bay with the Gulf of Mexico. The jetties were supposed to keep the channel open, but the pass filled with sand within a few years.

What the rock piers *did* accomplish was to give fishermen access to deeper waters near the shore and a small cove for beachcombers. For some reason, the beach here is littered with shells more so than the open beaches. The rock piles are alive with sea life including sea turtles, small fish, sea anemones, and unusual species of shrimp.

The park also has another section of beach that is protected from vehicular traffic. Set aside as a day-use area, the cordoned-off region is lightly used, especially since the bathhouse has been closed since a recent storm inflicted heavy damage to the concrete structure.

Most visitors are drawn to the south end of the park where they can drive their vehicles to the water's edge. For hearty campers who pitch their tents in the sand, the beach can accommodate 300 campsites. It is always best to get advice from the park staff before setting up camp because a high tide can make for some soggy sleeping bags.

The park has a 48-slot campground with utility hookups for RVs and campers located behind the dunes. While this area can be convenient, the bugs can be ferocious away from the Gulf breeze.

While encompassing almost 4,000 acres, the park includes fragile sand dunes and flat grasslands that stretch from the Gulf beaches to the bayside wetlands. The island supports a surprisingly diverse wildlife population in addition to migratory birds. The staff has mapped two paddling trails that follow the western shoreline and offer great opportunities for fishing and bird-watching.

Mustang Island State Park consistently rates among the busiest parks in the state system for good reason. It's a wonderful place to enjoy being on island time. The park is about 14 miles south of Port Aransas and two miles north of where Park Road 22 enters the island from Corpus Christi. 





# The Other Side of Sleep

You don't want to catch Owen Egerton's *The Other Side of Sleep* just because the man's moving to L.A. for a while and will be co-writing scripts for movies you'll see on a big screen

somewhere and then you can say you saw him back in the day. You don't want to catch Egerton's two-hour, video-enhanced show only because his recent novel, *The Book of Harold, the Illegitimate Son of God*, is as good (note: exceedingly good) as it is, even though the man's literary skills definitely inform the live performance here. You don't even want to grab a ticket to this show because it's directed by Les McGehee, although McGehee's flair for timing and flourish is delightfully evident in the staging of this spectacle.

No, see, you want to attend this show because you want a night of solid, one-man entertainment, because you miss the sort of monologue work Whoopi Goldberg did before she got all celebrified, because you've always wanted a bit more Patton Oswalt in your Garrison Keillor, because you know that sometimes life can get real fucked up and sometimes that is one of the funniest things about it.

Egerton has a small mob of people he's let out onto paper, and now he brings several of them off the printed page and unleashes them right in front of you. The closeted leader of a Christian youth group trying to "rap" with his young charges. The Waffle House Quality Inspector struggling through a meal in god-awful circumstances. The second-in-command of a weird love cult, making a last stand behind the barbed wire of his embattled group's alligator-farm compound. The two *Star Wars* geeks camping out in a tent in the line for *Episode I: The Phantom Menace*. The young creative type, living and loving a slacker's life in the ATX until he encounters the fears, the joys, the transcendence of parenthood.

There are a few others, including the interstitial vlogger trying to set a no-sleep record, and they're all (whether intentionally or helplessly) missing a few of their 40 winks. You won't be thinking about sleep other than abstractly during this show, though: Egerton keeps the energy high – and the quality of the monologues often matches these pinnacles – and McGehee's made sure there's no dead air, not even during the intermission in which that vlogger's in the john.

Especially due to the seriocomic depth of the alligator cultist, the gut-bustingly hilarious *Star Wars* escapade, and Egerton's coining of the Most Outrageous Yet Accurate Simile So Far This Century (you'll know it when you hear it), we happily recommend this show.



# Always ... Patsy Cline

In a culture seemingly dominated by celebrity and shamelessness, the thought that a famous artist might also be a genuine human being is comforting. In the case of Patsy Cline, that image in fact held some truth.

Based on a true story, Always ...

Patsy Cline by Ted Swindley is a revue
of Cline's music and also a story of one
night in the life of the young country
singer, when she befriended someone
ordinary and showed how ordinary she
herself was in turn.

Louise (Edie Elkjer) is a divorcée with small children. She loves Patsy Cline's music enough to call into the local radio station in Houston every morning to request one of Cline's songs. When Cline (Selena Rosanbalm) arrives to perform in Houston, Louise is there in the front row, and through a little luck and a little audacity, she meets the singer face-to-face. To her astonishment, Cline sits right down with her, and Louise discovers, through the course of the evening's performance, that it isn't just the music that's lovely. It's also the singer.

This production is a revival of the same show TexARTS produced two years ago, directed by Todd Dellinger and Robin Lewis. I didn't see the original, but the show seems to be mostly unchanged. A few things stand out.

First, Rosanbalm deserved every ounce of recognition she received for her performance. (She was nominated in the category of Acting in a Leading Role by the Austin Critics Table.) She has a beautiful, excellent voice, and rather than mimic Patsy Cline, she makes the

songs into a tribute by grabbing what's at the heart of them and owning the music. Rosanbalm also lets the frustrations of Cline's life peek through her charm and warmth without letting them dominate. This isn't a play that people go to because they want a tale of loneliness and despair; they go because they love the music. Rosanbalm gives her portrayal of Cline texture without losing sight of the loveliness that drew people to the singer.

Second, TexARTS should post guards wherever they keep their wardrobe (designed by Katie Uhler). I want that green dress. *Want. It.* 

(The other costumes were nice, too – lots of early Sixties evening wear, a great visual to back up the music.)

Third, TexARTS has one of the nicest front-of-house operations I've encountered in a while, which went quite a ways toward assuaging my frustrations after I fought traffic for an hour to make the 7:30pm curtain. Obviously, heavy traffic is not the fault of the company. However, as most Chronicle readers will be making the trek to Lakeway from Austin, they should leave themselves plenty of time to get there and consider going on a weekend. Those who go should find Always ... Patsy Cline to be a nice show with superb music. And a killer green dress. - Elizabeth Cobbe

# Monsters

D: Gareth Edwards; with Scoot McNairy, Whitney Able. (R, 97 min.)

Director Gareth Edwards has said in interviews that he initially envisioned that his first film would be told via a handheld subjective camera, Blair Witch-style, and from the perspective

of survivors of an alien invasion. Then Matt Reeves' Cloverfield came along in 2008 and did just that, thus inadvertently - blessedly scuttling any shaky-cam plans for Monsters. Instead, Edwards favors long, still, and frankly stunning shots that could have been mistaken for a "My Mexican Honeymoon" scrapbook - Mayan ruins, a pontoon boat glossing over water at sunrise - were it not for the background 'scapes of bombed-out towns and baby monsters nesting in trees to muck up the works. And what magnificent muck: This is apocalypse in medias res, set six years after a NASA probe fell to Earth - at the U.S./ Mexico border, to be specific – and unleashed alien matter that has since thrived and multiplied. The military walled in the infected zone, as it's known, and once a year shuts down the coastal route between the uninfected portions of Mexico and America for the aliens' six-month breeding period. At the film's beginning, photographer Kaulder (McNairy), a sort-of professional creature chaser, reluctantly agrees to escort

his boss' daughter, Samantha (Able), out of Mexico and back to her stateside fiancé: with two days to go before the military shuts down passage, their attempt to flee has a lastplane-out-of-Saigon feel to it. It goes without saving that all hell breaks loose - again and again and again - and Edwards' film (which

world-premiered at SXSW Film 2010) is ruth-

forgoing the shock-and-awe-and-goopy-gore so

lessly effective at teasing suspense while

common to contemporary monster movies.

Well, maybe not the awe: When Kaulder and

Samantha finally come face-to-face with the

creatures, there's a religiosity to the moment

in the vein of Close Encounters of the Third Kind. (There's audience awe, too, at how convincing Monsters' creatures and digitally composed backdrops look, considering the tiny budget; Edwards, previously a special effects artist, did all the FX work himself in post on a donated Dell computer.) While there are certainly political parallels to be made here - you don't make a movie about an Americassplitting fence by accident – Monsters wears its pacifism lightly. If some of Kaulder and Samantha's observations sound naive, even banal, that's because the film is almost entirely unscripted (and, excepting McNairy and Able, performed by nonactors); there's a ter-

> rific authenticity to their deepening relationship, in the intimate details they selectively piece out, their teasing badinage when things are going well, and the bound-by-terror connection forged when things are going very badly indeed. Their slow burn is beautifully understated,

and McNairy especially is a revelation as the semisurly Kaulder, a character far afield of the sweet neurotics McNairy has played for former Austin filmmaker Alex Holdridge (In Search of a Midnight Kiss). Forget the title: Monsters is a very human drama, and a forgiving one, at that. Nobody here - not the military, not the border businessmen who determine who stavs and who goes, not even the monsters – are really monsters. That, too, may sound banal, but that's my fault and not that of the film, which is a startlingly original and haunting take on our ageless fear of otherness. CONVICTION D: Tony Goldwyn; with Hilary Swank, Sam Rockwell, Minnie Driver, Melissa Leo, Peter Gallagher, Juliette Lewis, Clea DuVall, Karen Young.

Conviction tells the true story of Betty Anne Waters (Swank), a high school dropout and single mom who spends 18 years of her life getting a GED and law degree for the express purpose of exonerating her brother Kenny (Rockwell) from prison, where he is serving a life sentence for a murder she believes he did not commit. The movie is a fairly boilerplate affair about the long, hard slog to fight injustice, though, to be fair, most of the personal slog is left out of the drama. One scene mentions that Betty Anne just got her GED, in another we see her asleep at her desk with an unfinished torts paper, then the next thing we know, she's passing the bar exam. As for her bartending job, one wonders how she ever managed to clock in before last call. However, as the title says, this is a story about conviction and not a procedural. As such, Swank is well-cast as the movie's working-class heroine possessed of a singular purpose and a strong regional accent: It's the kind of character that won her Oscars for both Boys Don't Cry and Million Dollar Baby. Rather than focus on the details of Betty Anne's personal struggle, Conviction spends more time depicting her jailhouse visits with Kenny, and recurring flashbacks help explain the uncommon bonds of loyalty between the two that were forged during their harsh childhood. The outcome of the story is never in doubt, and in this regard Conviction pales in comparison with the last pairing of screenwriter Pamela Gray and director Goldwyn: 1999's unconventional love story, A Walk on the Moon. Rockwell commands attention as a character whose pent-up seething has become something of a specialty for the actor. Most notable in Conviction are the secondary roles, however. Leo, as the arresting cop, plays an ignoble character for a change; Driver is solid as Betty Anne's best friend Abra Rice; and Gallagher portrays Barry Scheck, whose Innocence Project and its promotion of DNA evidence helped reopen the musty case. In two scenes as Kenny's trashed-out, perjuring ex-girlfriend, Lewis delivers the kind of delectable performance that is remembered at awards time. And though the film conveys a satisfactory sense of justice being served, the final resolution is nevertheless unsettling. Although it is proven that Kenny Waters is not the brutal murderer of Katharina Brow, his exoneration means that the woman's real killer has escaped justice and is, presumably, still on the loose. - Marjorie Baumgarten

#### LAST TRAIN HOME D: Lixin Fan. (NR, 87 min., subtitled)

This small masterpiece of documentary filmmaking offers a human-scale look at the impact of China's industrial growth. First-time director Fan, a Chinese-Canadian, focuses his camera on one family over a period of several years, and could not have

outcome would be. Rural peasants by birth, married couple Zhang Changhua and Chen Suqin made the decision 17 years ago to leave their children behind with their grandmother and seek work far away in the city factories to earn money to send home for the support of their children so that their offspring might have a better life than that of their parents. Changhua and Sugin are just two of 130 million migrant workers in the cities who make the long journey home but once a year (during the week of Chinese New Year) to visit their families. As revealed in the film's preamble, this custom represents the largest human migration in the world. And it's a sight to behold. The annual exodus from the railroad station in the city of Guangzhou is better characterized as a stampede, a swarm of humanity, carrying a year's worth of worldly acquisitions, rushing the train platforms for a place in the packed, standing-room-only rail cars. These staggering images are returned to again and again, and reveal that Changhua and Sugin are but specks within this national story. Back home after the arduous journey by rail, sea, and bus, they reunite with their young son Yang and teenage daughter Qin. Although they bring desired gifts and reassert their wishes for their children to study hard so that they may have more options open to them in their adulthood, Qin is a rebellious teenager who is weary of school and subsistence farming. She resents her parents, who, she feels, abandoned her when she was an infant and care more about acquiring money than raising their children. The film's dramatic crisis occurs once 17-year-old Qin leaves school to work in the city and be on her own, much to the devastation of her parents. The only thing the uneducated, unskilled Changhua and Sugin feel they can accomplish in this world is to make a better life for their children, and now they realize that circumstances have made that impossible. Theirs is a story with a million echoes. And if this sounds as though it's a situation happening on the other side of the world, think again. This is a story about the economic fallout of globalization. Look no further than those boxes of garments stamped "Made in China" that we see in the corners of Changhua and Sugin's sewing factory. The shirts on our backs here in the U.S. are connected to the Zhang family's prospects – Marjorie Baumgarten for the future. \*\*\* Arbor

Believe the hype: Paranormal Activity 2 is exactly what you think or hope it is but no more and no less. I loathed the first film, but its cheap shocks and wait ... wait

... wait ... gotchas were a box-office cash machine that could not be ignored. C'est la mort, yeah? Paranormal Activity 2 is something of a prequel to Oren Peli's initial film. That means there's another sequel in the works and - you can bet your afterlife on it - this is going to be the most lucrative genre franchise since the Scary Movie movies, or possibly the Saw films. Either way, it's a sure sign that the porous rules and tropes of reality TV have taken over reality, and that's never a good thing. But, most importantly, does it scare the hell out of you? Well, yes, it does, but only in the same way that a sudden draft of wind does, when it slams an unexpected door on the cat. As it turns out (and we're not giving anything away here), the new pair of victims, Kristi and Dan (Grayden and Boland, both of whom do exactly what they need to do) are related to the previous couple by blood ties. Plus, they have a child and a German shepherd in tow. It's not enough. It's unlikely that anyone who did not see the first film will want to see Paranormal Activity 2. The entire production is faux cinema verité, captured remarkably via security apparatus and nanny cams. That's the pitch, really: Supernatural stuff happens, and the audience gets to view it in edited real time. Granted, this inevitable follow-up is considerably spookier than its predecessor, but only in terms of the amount of jump-out-of-your-seatiness and the fact that there's a new set, with matching suburban-tacky furniture. You've got to hand it to Reynolds, director Cortés, and screenwriter Chris Sparling; they milk every single frisson of nail-ripping anxiety. Cortés shovels on mounds of ever-mounting tension with artfully claustrophobia-inducing camerawork and a few freak-out surprises, and Reynolds, all sweat and eyeballs, manages to rivet both our gaze and sympathy. 

Neither so awful as to be enjoyable nor eerily artful enough to be anything other than a snoozy also-ran in the perpetually poor plotting machine that is the demon-child cinematic subgenre, Case 39 is exactly as forgettable as, I'd wager, the 38 previous ones. Zellweger plays Emily Jenkins, a social worker assigned to the hellishly problematic case of 10-yearold Lily Sullivan (Ferland). Lily is a raven-locked, plaid-jumper-wearing emissary of the damned, whose parents, clearly aware of genre tropes and acting accordingly, tried and failed to bake her alive in the family oven. In a professionally questionable breach of protocol, Emily petitions the court to become the child's guardian, and before you can say, "Rosemary's ba...!" various and sundry character actors begin dying in horrible ways. Ferland is suitably creepy in the devil-child role, and there's nothing embarrassing about Zellweger's performance at all, but Case 39 fails to make an impression by sheer dint of its mediocre sameness. Dowdle, who helmed Quarantine, does manage a few moments of well-calibrated terror, and Shyamalan's trickery with audience expectations is decidedly in effect, but it's not enough to merit a full 80 minutes. This is high school sexual politics in the app age, but director Gluck offsets his take on The Way We Live Now, Thumbs a-Go-Go Edition with overt references to the days of John Hughes-era hookups and their quaint-seeming conundrums of class, clique, and taste. The loose inspiration here is The Scarlet Letter, that old chestnut about a passionate woman undone by her community's unthinking castigation. Easy A is a surprisingly warmhearted examination of hypocrisy and social insecurity, unlikely camaraderie and stutter-stepped formation of adult identity. While those of us who recall the psychological heft and bad-dream imagery of classic Craven fervently wish the man would figure out where he misplaced his nail-biting narrative mojo, it's nowhere in evidence here. My Soul To Take kicks off with a relatively decent premise. On the very night a seven-personality schizoid serial killer, dubbed the Riverton Ripper (Esparza). attempts to slaughter his own family, a septet of newborns enter the world. Flash forward 16 years and the seven potentially deadly sons and daughters of that accursed night are suddenly suspect as a new wave of Ripper-esque bloodlettings commence (and Thieriot's aptly nicknamed loner, Bug, is tagged as prime suspect No. 1). What stings the most is that Craven is so blatantly, enervatingly going through the motions here. This utterly mediocre forget-me-now could've been crafted by any faceless serial director at all. If Tyler Perry were to move his filming operation from Atlanta to Memphis and ratchet up his ensemble dramas to the level of melodramatic hysteria while also disrupting the narrative flow with unnecessary details and erratic scene changes, the result might be something like N-Secure, the story of an obsessive tyrant and the women who suffer his abuse. Set amid the well-to-do urban denizens of Memphis, this indie film tries hard and seemingly means well but fails to hit the mark, even though it cribs many of its actors from various Perry movies. David Washington (Moore) is a successful executive but also a martinet and jealous boyfriend. Disjointed storylines appear and disappear with regularity. Friendships unravel, crimes are committed, paternity tests are scuttled, and so on. David's villainy is almost comical in its extremity and completely unbelievable. Early reactions to this filmed adaptation of Kazuo Ishiguro's undeniably under-the-skin Never Let Me Go seemed to share the same basic complaint (and you should stop reading now if you'd like the film's central mystery to be kept just that): Why didn't they fight back? The British children highlighted in the film, all clones, are to have their parts harvested in a series of "donations" once they reach maturation. In their later bloom, aging ever closer to donation, they are portrayed by a forceful triumverate: Oscar nominee Mulligan - tight-lipped and watchful plays Kathy; Knightley is the bullying but magnetic Ruth; and Garfield is Tommy, who has not found his voice. Romanek (One Hour Photo) wisely doesn't play this as a sci-fi story, but he also doesn't lean hard enough on the philosophic underpinnings of the piece. Alas, he doesn't lean too hard on anything: Subdued filmmaking with material this fundamentally gut-punching is hard to swallow. (10/08/2010)- Kimberlev Jones

This movie about John Lennon's young-adult years prior to the success of the Beatles uncovers no new dimensions regarding the musician's parental issues (he was raised by an aunt and uncle when his biological parents proved unable - long story there). Still, artist-turned-filmmaker Taylor-Wood gives us an evocative telling of Lennon's early years, a depiction all the more remarkable for Johnson's lack of resemblance to the film's subject. The film is loosely based on a memoir written by Lennon's half-sister Julia Baird, yet anyone who has listened to Lennon's intensely autobiographical songwriting, especially from his post-Beatles years, may find Nowhere Boy more redundant than revelatory. The performances are what really put this biopic over the top and clarify the importance of the strong women in Lennon's early life, perhaps laying the groundwork for his later gravitation toward feminist ideals. Willis plays a retired CIA badass named Frank Moses who, when the Agency decides to clean out the old guard, is forced to round up his Cold War "associates" - Freeman's rest-home-residing Joe, Cox's bearish ex-Soviet Ivan, Malkovich's paranoid comic foil Marvin, and the elegant Mirren as ex-MI6 operative Victoria. Red is, at its heart, a rom-com, guns 'n' bombs mash-up that poses serious questions about the role of the aged in a youth-mad, globalized system and then answers them with a smirk and a whole lot of terrifically choreographed action set-pieces. Saddle up for some old-fashioned inspirational movie entertainment as Disney mounts the story of horse-racing's 1973 Triple Crown winner. Actually, the focus of the movie is not really the horse but the people who owned and trained him and shared with him the will to succeed. How do we know the animal had a will to succeed? Because owner Penny Chenery Tweedy (Lane) stares into his eyes and channels his desires. The outcome of Secretariat's story is already part of our popular knowledge prior to any film treatment of the events, thus allowing the movie to focus on the characters' journeys rather than their finish lines. Thus, Secretariat is more a story of Mrs. Tweedy. Drafted to her side are the eccentric trainer Lucien Lauren (a restrained Malkovich), groom Eddie Sweat (Ellis), and jockey Ron Turcotte (real-life jockey Thorwarth). Some audiences will cheer as though they were at the track, but Secretariat is ultimately a conventional story, conventionally told. Fincher's blisteringly entertaining The Social Network touches down in the calm before the storm, before social media rewrote the rules on how information moves. We first meet the eventual founder of Facebook, Mark Zuckerberg (Eisenberg), in a bar, having drinks with his girlfriend (Mara). He is callous, socially inept, and ravenously ambitious - the boy who would be king, not yet fixed on what the kingdom will look like. The Social Network cuts with ease from flashbacks of Zuckerberg's undergraduate days to depositions related to two concurrent lawsuits brought against him. Although the legal proceedings provide a handy framework for the film, who did what to whom, when, and with how much premeditated bloodlust is of ancillary concern to the film's layered examination of an asshole. (That's the filmmakers' word, not mine.) History as we know it is still unfurling, and The Social Network is that rare film that has something not yet definitive, but certainly provocative – to say about it. Parole officer Jack (De Niro) oversees his case - it's his last one before retirement - and

very quickly Jack finds himself uncharacteristically invested in Stone and his flighty, manipulative wife, Lucetta (Jovovich). In a role that requires far more than the aerobic workout of her Resident Evil franchise, Jovovich is something to behold, working every angle of a complicated character. The rest of the cast is just as good. Religion infuses the film, at first casually, and then more overtly. Director Curran occasionally allows the film's tone to tip into hysteria (a bee metaphor is particularly belabored), but mostly this is a tense, portentous, and provocative piece. Ben Affleck touches down again in Boston, for his second time behind the camera, following 2007's well-received Gone Baby Gone. Ingrained violence and OxyContin addiction are casual facts in Charlestown, but Doug MacRay (Affleck) is trying to leave both behind, opting instead to knock over banks. Doug runs a crew with his childhood friend James (Renner, scary and rabid), and in a tight, fierce opening sequence, we see just how good these men are at their jobs. In that same sequence, Doug meets a woman named Claire (Hall) and, through her, begins to imagine a life outside of Charlestown. The tenderness of Affleck and Hall's scenes together elevate the routine one-last-job-and-l'm-out plot. Most of the film embraces a sort of moral ambiguity, but the climax - a well-staged series of calamities - and its sunset coda unsettlingly whitewash that complexity. (09/17/2010) - Kimberley Jones

The premise of Waiting for 'Superman' is that the system is broken - that public schools in America have failed to meet the needs of the last few generations of children and that the system is saddled with so many layers of bureaucracy. outdated assumptions, and institutionalized mediocrity that it is impossible to fix from within. Guggenheim goes further by suggesting that charter schools are the answer to the problem, and follows five students from around the country in the months leading up to these schools' annual admission by lottery. Ultimately, it may be the case that Guggenheim is a better instigator than filmmaker, as the debate about our educational system appears to be on the upswing at present. Yes, Jacob (LaBeouf) wants to make big bucks, but mostly so he can help fund green energy research to gain the approval of his liberal blogger girlfriend, Winnie (Mulligan), who is also the estranged daughter of Gekko. Money Never Sleeps is an enlivening and rather wickedly entertaining take on the occasional angels – but mostly demons – that ran the country into financial ruin. In Allen's latest romantic roundelay, You Will Meet a Tall Dark Stranger, it is libido that ostensibly drives all the characters - Alfie (Hopkins) to ditch his senior-aged wife Helena (Jones) for a nubile new bride, his daughter Sally (Watts) to make eyes at her boss (Banderas), and Sally's failed novelist husband, Roy (Brolin, boorish and frankly unbearable), to court their comely neighbor (Pinto) - but it's a weirdly inert kind of libido. In theory, there are some interesting ideas here: How disaffection pushes these characters to marinate in drink; how they assiduously avoid truth-telling, only to be confronted with inevitable fallout of so many lies. But in practice, the characters are one-dimensional cutouts kept at a dogged remove. Their miseries are a bore maybe to Allen, too, who abruptly ends the film just when it finally catches some dramatic traction. Still, who can blame him? #### **GEEZER CAR HAS GEEZER WINDOW. BUT ONLY IN THE COLD**

Dear Tom and Ray:

I've got a Buick – a geezer car – because I'm a geezer. It's wonderful at eliminating road rage because it is completely incompetent at driving aggressively. The ride is mushy, and the mileage is mediocre. In other words, it's absolutely perfect, except for one thing: When it is cold, the normally speedy electric window creeps up and down. It moves so slowly that I have to start lowering the window a half-mile before a highway toll. So my question is: What can I plug into the cigarette-lighter slot that will boost the power to the window motor? A cattle prod? A Taser? I don't want a whole second battery. I'd like a more elegant solution and hopefully a less expensive one.

TOM: Well, inexpensive might be tough in this case, Bill. And you definitely came to the wrong guys if you want elegant!

RAY: The two things I'd suspect would be the window motor and the window regulator.


laid on Halloween or any other night of the vear, it's best to avoid places with children altogether - even and especially if you're a pedophile. This is not to say you can't score some strange with chil-
