



The Sky Is Always Falling

The hyping of catastrophe, and a notable loss

In general, it is safe to say that this column is often repetitious, the same points made over and over again, sometimes in different words, sometimes not. This is especially true when it comes to politics, I think because of a certain frustration with the of ideological nonsense being bought and sold, from the far left to the far right and most stops in between.

This, according to many, is the worst of times. The current American hysteria is over our failed government, our doomed future, our lost freedoms, and the destruction wrought by the parasites destroying this country from within. The most destructive element of these parasites' political makeup is usually defined by the ideology of those who are sounding warnings about them.

Obviously, there are major problems facing this country, as well as issues on which the public is divided - sometimes so militantly divided that no reconciliation seems possible. Not to whitewash anything, but the only problem with the multiple "the sky is falling" crowds is that there is nothing new or unique about this situation. It may be more heightened than at other times, but that is not because the problems and issues are so much worse. It's that so many politicians and concerned citizens are indulging in rhetoric specifically designed to increase tensions.

The holier-than-thou crowds are especially troublesome, from those on the left who believe everything this country does is evil and corrupt to the most ardently self-declared patriots on the right. Unfortunately, the latter group is best defined by a lack of true patriotism as well as by politics that, despite lip service to the contrary, at their core repudiate the Constitution.

Let me bring home this column's self-indulgent leanings described in my opening paragraph by quoting from several previous columns.

From Nov. 12, 2010, "Page Two":

"What is especially upsetting here is the absolute glee with which self-proclaimed, commonsense patriots describe and defame these un-American, anti-American Americans. It sounds as if they couldn't be any happier than they are when hating and denouncing other citizens.

From Nov. 26, 2010, "Page Two":

"In sum, overall discussion over taxation, the budget, and the deficit is a shadow-puppet play in which those complaining the loudest deny any culpability for the problem. The out-of-control spending by Republicans during the Bush administration, the still-costly involvement in two wars, the overly generous tax cuts, as well as strong pro-business policies, long crucial planks in the Republican platform - that left the economy devastated – are almost never brought up. Sorry, but the current horrendous deficit and accompanying tax burden is at least partially due to the way more-conservative, often Republican, citizens of the republic voted during the last decade.'

(The last sentence of that column, "Blaming it all on liberals and/or illegal aliens is really just fantasy," is wrong. The whole premise of that sentiment is rotten. Any group not

> accepting its share of the blame in this country's current fiscal crises but instead assigning it all to some other group is a malevolent fiction used to attack other Americans.)

> > From Dec. 3, 2010, "Page Two":

"We are living in a time when most don't accept the burdens of their own greater responsibilities but do actively lament and angrily denounce other citizens for not accepting their responsibilities. ...

[W]hen the overall community is faced with significant problems, rather than coming together ... to solve them, it instead begins the search for what caused them. The idea is that laying blame is an act of mending, of repair.'

The current budgetary crises were not created by the bleeding-heart left. It is also not because the country is undergoing a daft redistribution of wealth at the insistence of a handful of atheist Marxists. It is because all are busy staking their claims to the sanctity of one part of the budget or another. "Cut elsewhere, but not here" is the cry.

Just watch what happens when the federal government tries to cut funding for a weapons program that the Pentagon has declared obsolete. Labor joins with management, the right with the left in the area that will be affected, in the communities that will lose jobs.

"The critics of this failed government ... make it clear that the issue is not a series of complex problems that are incredibly difficult to solve. It seems that most members of the anti-government community have no doubt that they themselves are good, moral, honest, genuine patriots operating from only the noblest ambitions. They know that what our government needs in order for it to work is for exactly such people as themselves to get elected."


Given the incredible number of American citizens either elected to office, appointed, hired as civil servants, or hired in some other capacity, the notion that far too many of them are purposefully evil and corrupt seems beyond naive. Saying that it isn't all of them, but a goodly portion, doesn't make it sound more rational. Arguing that the solution for improving government is getting these people out of office and putting good people in seems genuinely lunatic.


If one does believe the federal government is so hopelessly broken, wouldn't some kind of advocacy for dramatically changing the system have to be part of a reform package?

I don't actually believe that most people involved in government, or even a significant number of them, are corrupt or evil. The problems seem to be those inherent in a democratic constitutional republic, where theoretically every citizen is fully enfranchised.

Over the years, tough-talking candidates, running on their loyalty to ideological extremes, have been elected. The best of them come to realize that they are elected to serve all their constituents and not just their core base of ideological fellow travelers. They are often denounced as traitors to the cause. The worst never come to this realization, resist compromise, and treat all political opponents as knowingly evil. These folks are often celebrated by true believers, but they are the most virulent cancers our body politic faces.

Regardless, once elected, they all find out that what they can do is limited; solutions that to an armchair legislator seem obvious and easy (passing new laws, getting rid of old ones) almost never are. Most laws were not passed capriciously or to benefit aliens from another dimension. The reasons for the laws are almost never as simplistic as charged, and changing them is almost always of far greater consequence than assumed.

The reality is the critics' views of the problems are that most politicians are evil; there is too much compromise and not enough hardcore allegiance to the extreme views of the different "isms." If one buys into this point of view, then the first and most fundamental change this country needs is to get rid of the Constitution.

There are those who insist that not only is there one objective truth, but that they know it. Our favorite conspiracy-hobbyist cheerleader, Alex Jones, assures us that he speaks the "truth" rather than just offering an opinion. One of our regular forum posters has decided that his opinion is the "objective truth." These truth-owners are purer and better than the rest of us. Not following them makes us stupid, compliant, decadent, destructive, and scared.

If one wants to argue that there is one absolute, knowable truth that is abstract and not that easy to decipher, there are strong arguments to support that view.

Possessing truly provincial, parochial views, the "I-Speak-the-True-Truth" charmers are quick to condemn the thoughts and beliefs of others. This comes not from certainty but from fear, not from dispassionate analysis but from the refusal to think, not from patriotism but from narcissism. Arguing with them is like arguing with a narcissist or a stubborn, spoiled child.

Oddly, the Founding Fathers did not argue that their words were concrete truth, and most religious, scientific, social, and political leaders acknowledge not just the existence of ambiguity but the constant possibility of error.

(Insisting that their words and opinions are not just based in reasoning but are the absolute truth kicks them into the category of the deity, doesn't it?)

I say here the same thing I've been saying for years: It is not representative government that has failed; it's citizens who are not interested in their responsibilities but champion their rights while trying to deprive others of their rights.

Unless something unexpected happens, this will be the last "Page Two" on politics this year.

On a personal note: Tuesday afternoon, Abraham Black, my father, died quietly in his sleep. He was 90. There are

LOOK TO DALLAS FOR TOD SUCCESS

Dear Editor.

Austin's meager success with transit-oriented development can largely be explained by contrasting Austin with Dallas, where transit-oriented development has been successful ["Not So Hot TODs," News, Nov. 26]. The difference is that Dallas has invested heavily in a light rail system which crisscrosses the city and runs day and night. In contrast, Austin's one line has limited hours. In addition to reflecting how much has been invested in light rail, the different experieces with transit-oriented development reflects the Dallas system's having been in operation for decades.

The numerous residential high rises Downtown refute Randal O'Toole's contention that transitionoriented development is doomed due to its failure to offer "single-family homes with large yards." While many people enjoy lawns, there is obviously a market for attractive multifamily buildings.

Finally, transit-oriented development has to be considered in light of fuel prices and transport infrastructure. As long as fuel prices remain low and funding, including the recently passed Proposition 1, overwhelming favors cars, there is less incentive for transit-oriented development.

- The city hosted two public forums Tuesday with the four finalists to be the next police monitor when **Cliff Brown** steps down at the end of the year to become a district judge. For a breakdown of the candidates, see "Point Austin," right, and Jordan Smith's "Choose Your Monitor: The Four Finalists," at the Newsdesk blog, austinchronicle.com/newsdesk.
- > City Council meets Thursday, Dec. 9, for its second-to-last meeting of the year. Fireworks should flare during council's 3pm incarnation as the Austin Housing Finance Corporation, during which members will decide on some \$10 million in affordable housing proposals, including the controversial Marshall Apartments plan. See "City Hall Hustle," p.20.
- Time's up: Friday, Dec. 10, is the last day to fill out the Austin Comprehensive Plan public survey - available in English and Spanish at www.imagineaustin.net - concluding the third phase of public input. Never fear, though - after planners take a stab at a first draft of the plan. they'll be asking for opinions once again.
- > The public can meet Abigail Smith, the last of five animal services officer candidates to be vetted, at a forum on Tuesday, Dec. 14, 6-7pm, at the Palmer Events Center. Due to a death in her family, Smith - director of the Tompkins County SPCA in Ithaca, N.Y. - was unable to attend the November forum with the other four finalists.



- Colorado County and Fayette County pecan growers say sulfur dioxide from the coal-powered Fayette Power Project is killing their pecan trees. They have enlisted the Sierra Club's help in entreating both the Lower Colorado River Authority and Austin Energy – the plant's co-owners - to do something about it, but officials are denying culpability.
- > Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, and Speaker Joe Straus have sent a letter asking state agencies to cut an extra 2.5% from their general revenue spending in 2011. This comes on top of the 5% cut they demanded in January.
- > With ranking Republican legislators discussing a wholesale overhaul of school funding in the upcoming session, Comptroller Susan Combs has released a report showing that per-student expenditure has risen by 63% over the last decade, nearly double the rate of inflation.
- > Elizabeth Edwards, spouse of disgraced former presidential candidate John Edwards, died Tuesday. She retained her grace throughout her lengthy and public battle with cancer; as she said when she was diagnosed, "When bad things happen, you don't let them take you down."



> President Barack Obama announced a compromise with congressional Republicans on extended tax cuts - in exchange for an extension of unemployment benefits - and (like most such deals) it appears to have made nobody happy. The agreement will still have to work its way through a polarized Senate and House.



UT students staged a die-in in the West Mall on Friday, Dec. 3, to mark the 26th anniversary of the Union Carbide chemical leak in Bhopal, India, that killed thousands of people. Warren Anderson, then CEO of Union Carbide (now a Dow Chemical subsidiary), has been declared a fugitive from justice by Bhopal's chief judicial magistrate, but the U.S has resisted India's extradition efforts.

Watching the Watchers

City nears a crucial choice for the next police monitor

Anybody want to monitor the police? You might think such a thankless task - no matter

what you do, you'll be wrong - would go begging, but 66 hopefuls applied to replace current Police Monitor Cliff Brown, who is about to ascend to a district judgeship. The list has been winnowed to four, and their joint public unveiling was held in two sessions at the Millennium Youth Entertainment Complex Tuesday after-

noon and evening. Jordan Smith examines the candidates' particular bona fides in more detail this week on the Newsdesk blog, allowing me to assume the view from 30,000 feet and discuss the issues that have traditionally dogged the Office of the Police Monitor, or that arose in Tuesday's discussions.

1) While the crowd wasn't enormous - perhaps 50 people attended the early afternoon session - it was an engaged group genuinely interested in the position and the office.

2) Questions generally encouraged the candidates to try to strengthen the OPM, perhaps in the direction of subpoena power - the ability to mandate officer testimony and Internal Affairs evidence. (Ann del Llano said she would push to get subpoena power;

current Assistant Monitor Renita Sanders said that thus far the relationship with the police department has been cooperative, and a push for subpoena power might well create a more adversarial situation.)

3) There was some public sentiment that the OPM has been little more than a "toothless tiger" or public relations office - mainly from people

who believe that the city doesn't come down hard enough on misbehaving cops. (A different audience, or even a different venue, might well have produced quite the opposite sentiment. The public is audibly polarized on police issues.)

4) There was a curious thread in the discussion holding that previous law enforcement experience would somehow create the perception of a monitor unfairly biased toward police (candidates Margo Frasier and Cristina Beamud have spent some time as officers). If the candidates' experiences were limited solely to time spent on the force, I might agree, but as that's not the case, I didn't follow this objection. Any candidate might be biased, and it's arguable that a monitor with police experience might well do better at establishing public credibility as well as necessary

Hamilton, who was on call, was driving a department-issued Crown Victoria at the time of the accident. He was found standing near the car, which had rolled over - presumably with his SWAT gear inside - on Convict Hill Road, south of William Cannon Drive. "The Department's zero tolerance stance on DWI is well known throughout the APD and the community we serve," Chief Art Acevedo said in a statement. "Consistent with our stance, we are investigating Officer Hamilton's actions leading up to and following the crash." Reportedly, Hamilton had been out drinking with a group of fellow officers; in part, the investigation would determine the circumstances of that celebration and whether anyone knew how much Hamilton had to drink or whether he was intoxicated. Former Officer Leonardo Quintana, who was responsible for the shooting death of Nathaniel Sanders II in May 2009, was fired by Acevedo this spring for a single-car DWI crash in January but got his job back after an arbitrator ruled that his termination was out of line with DWI-related discipline Acevedo had previously meted out for other officers. (Quintana was subsequently terminated for an unrelated incident and is again seeking reinstatement.) At the conclusion of the Hamilton investigation, Acevedo said, the department will "take appropriate administrative and criminal action." - Jordan Smith
- **▶ WAS TODDLER'S DEATH AN ACCIDENT?** Travis County District Judge Charlie Baird will hear evidence Thursday, Dec. 9, from an expert witness who says the 2003 death of toddler Bryan Gutierrez was nothing more than a tragic accident. It will be the first testimony in a hearing on an appeal by Rosa Estela Olvera Jimenez, who was convicted and sentenced to 99 years for allegedly stuffing a wad of paper towels into Gutierrez's throat, which the state says ultimately led to the toddler's death. Jimenez argues that new evidence - the opinions of three leading pediatric specialists - now refutes the state's theory of the crime. Instead, the experts have opined in affidavits filed with the court that Gutierrez's injuries were most likely accidental, caused by the child placing towels in his own mouth. In response to Jimenez's appeal, filed in October by her attorney, Bryce Benjet, Travis County prosecutor Elizabeth Phillips argues that the opinions of the retained defense experts do not constitute new evidence. Rather, she wrote, the experts offer only "alternative theories from those presented by the State at trial concerning whether the choking was accidental." Even if the expert evidence were to be considered new, the state argues, it still wouldn't be enough to "unquestionably establish" Jimenez's innocence. After Thursday's hearing, Baird will hear the remaining testimony later this month.
- > YOGURT SHOP MURDERS NOT FORGOTTEN Nineteen years after the grisly quadruple murder in a North Austin yogurt shop, prosecutors are still testing DNA evidence to try to link a suspect to the murders of Eliza Thomas, 17; sisters Jennifer and Sarah Harbison, 17 and 15; and Amy Ayers, 13. The four teens were found on Dec. 6, 1991, at the yogurt shop where the two older girls worked. They had been bound, gagged, shot, and burned in a fire that investigators said was set to cover the crime. It wasn't until eight years later that investigators said they'd found those responsible: four men who were also teens at the time of the murders. Robert Springsteen and Michael Scott were tried and convicted of the crime, but their convictions were later tossed out by the courts. (For lack of evidence, prosecutors dropped the charges against a third suspect, Maurice Pierce, whom they had dubbed the crime's "mastermind." The case against the fourth. Forrest Welborn. was abandoned after two grand juries failed to indict him.) Last year, the charges against Springsteen and Scott were dismissed after previously undiscovered DNA found inside one of the victims came back with an unknown male profile. Investigators are still looking for the owner of that DNA, a District Attorney's Office spokesman told the Chronicle, with DNA samples still being collected and tested. - J.S.

A BEAUTIFUL DAY IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

City politics and the people way over there

Judging by the chatter on the **Austin Neighborhoods Council** listserv and an angry AustinPost blog from activist **Debbie Russell**, it seems the Hustle rattled a few cages last week in referencing our fair city's "homeowner/neighborhood association-dominated body politic." But one need only look at the City Council agenda for this Thursday, Dec. 9, to see the impact of neighborhood voices in determining what draws the most attention.

For once, the main event may not even arise on the actual agenda but during council's 3pm break, when the members reconvene to give the Austin Housing Finance Corporation uncharacteristic scrutiny, as they're set to approve \$2.5 million in funding for the **Marshall Apartments** permanent supportive housing proposal. As we've written previously, PSH is part of the city's solution to homelessness and housing instability, offering not only housing but supportive services on-site (in the case of the Marshall proposal, not just to the 20 units currently slated for PSH inhabitants but to the entire 100-unit complex as a whole, located at 1401 E. 12th and 1157 Salina).

While the Kealing Neighborhood Association has lent its support, the Robertson Hill and Swede Hill neighborhood associations have come out against the proposal, citing their fears about introducing an undesirable use into the area. But the proposal has also ripped the scab off festering resentment at East 12th Street's delayed development while its neighbor in the urban renewal zone, 11th Street, is a comparative flurry of revitalization. While the \$2.5 million allocation of 2006 bond dollars is a big step in the process, it's not the last; the AHFC is also slated to submit a \$6 million private activity bond financing request to the Texas Bond Review Board to further pay for the project, undertaken by Summit Housing Partners and Caritas, setting a public hearing and final approval vote at council's Jan. 13 meeting – although with opponents unable to find traction so far, it's difficult to imagine these actions turning around midstream.

There's more action on the zoning agenda, with the belated return of the **Park Planned Unit Development** anchoring the items. Originally floated a year or so back, the plot at 801 Barton Springs Rd. – the old Filling Station tract, sandwiched between the Austin Energy building and law offices, and currently home to a few food trailers – raised eyebrows when it was submitted for PUD zoning, which is usually applied to large, omnibus projects, the opposite of the 0.8-acre park parcel. Moreover, the applicants' original 180-foot height request was laughably

out of scale with surrounding uses, although their current 96-foot request is still well above the 60-foot guideline in the Bouldin Creek neighborhood plan. Despite staff recommendation not to approve, the Bouldin homies are watching closely.

Having a "homeowner/neighborhood association-dominated body politic" doesn't mean that Jeff Jack wins every argument, that council takes every Planning Commission recommendation as gospel, or that Richard Suttle is reduced to picking up shifts at LegalZoom. It means that issues affecting our landed gentry invariably dominate – even if that means what might be good policy for the whole city is sometimes trumped by the backlash. And looking back, the issues that dominated 2010 – tax breaks for historic homes, comprehensive planning, placement of supportive housing, the tap dance over urban rail, the mobility bonds, even the growth Rorshach test of Water Treatment Plant No. 4 – are all neighborhood ones.

BOOK 'EM, DANO!

Elsewhere on the agenda: Pay off those library fines for overdue books, because we need the money. Item 30 approves the "Architectural Building Program" for

the new **Central Library**, the document that will guide the building's spaces and amenities.

Moreover, it sets the funding amounts for the project, up to \$120 million, a bit more than the \$90 million approved by voters in the 2006 bond election. The overage is expected to be met by redirecting the city's Block 21 sale proceeds, funds from tech and equipment contracts, and more. Still, construction isn't set

contracts, and more. Still, construction isn't set to start until January 2013, so you could just renew 'em and pay the fine later

Also notable: Item 5, offering \$1.5 million in Americans With Disabilities Act-required sidewalk and ramp improvements, and Item 29, \$500,000 to build sidewalks near Metz and Blanton elementary schools – but neither paid for out of the just-approved transportation bond. Three presentations are listed for council's 10:30am morning briefings: Austin Energy's Resource Plan and Affordability Forecast, a presentation from the African American Resource Commission, and an update on the Small Business Workforce Development Pilot Program. And rounding out the evening agenda is public testimony and all but certain council action to approve an economic development incentive deal with solar energy firm SunPower – not that this meeting's likely to see too many rays of sunshine.

buy-in from officers. The wider the candidate's previous experience, the better.

5) A few people suggested that the OPM or the Citizen Review Panel might somehow be invested with direct disciplinary powers, presumably to remove the process from the APD itself, although the closest model anybody could think of was the Los Angeles Police Commission, a rather different beast that oversees the entire LAPD on policy matters (much like the Austin City Council's relation to the city manager). Whatever the advisability of a move in that direction, it would likely collide directly with Texas civil service law.

A Range of Experience

Those were some of the issues that came up repeatedly in the discussions, admittedly in fairly accelerated meet-and-greets that could then be supplemented by breakout discussions or mingling with the candidates. Some additional quick impressions:

1) All four candidates seem fully qualified and highly personable – a necessity in the job – and all have law degrees, although they bring very different strengths. Frasier and Sanders both have hands-on, related local experience, Frasier as Travis Co. sheriff, and Sanders as the current assistant monitor; del Llano has been working on police-related issues (city and state) from an activist perspective for many years; Beamud, the only out-of-towner, is currently the executive director of the Atlanta Citizen Review Board and previously established a police monitor's office in Eugene, Ore.

2) The list is unusual in that all four finalists are women – duly noted.

3) Unsurprisingly, Frasier and Beamud consider their previous police experience an advantage; del Llano said that while such experience shouldn't "disqualify" a candidate, she believes it creates a "conflict of interest" akin to a lawyer advocating for both sides in a legal dispute. That opinion, however, seems to presume that the monitor is representing the public against the police, which is not the job description.

4) Everybody agreed that "public outreach" is crucial to the effectiveness of the office, although there was disagreement over OPM's success at that task thus far. All four candidates say they are determined to expand the public presence of the OPM by whatever means possible.

What Next?

The perennially vexed question is how much power the monitor and the CRP should have - some police advocates still grumble that they exist at all, while others describe them as "toothless" and insist the process will work only if the OPM becomes an independent body with investigatory or even enforcement powers. Frankly, good cops welcome public oversight, not only because it's right, but because it invariably reinforces officers' community relationships. On the other hand, critics tend to overstate the weakness of the office, both in theory - it has definitely altered the dynamic of institutional police review and in fact: If it did not exist, the independent, highly critical, and indispensable KeyPoint investigation of the Nathaniel Sanders shooting would never have happened at all.

Others blame the police union for blocking or overturning APD discipline (supposedly making the OPM irrelevant), but those instances have been as much a consequence of departmental bungling (e.g., in the Leonardo Quintana case) or eventual conflicts with state civil service law. Some people who otherwise bristle at "law and order" politics suddenly become hanging juries when it comes to police officers. Cops are workers and public employees with due process rights, too; undermining those rights on flashpoint cases hardly helps the rest of us in the long run.

I would hope that whichever of these four candidates wins the appointment, she will retain (as Cliff Brown did) sufficient local political stroke to be able to sustain the office's credibility as well as to face down attacks over controversial cases. On that standard, Frasier likely ranks first, followed by Beamud, Sanders, and then del Llano (a long shot politically in any case, although it's a credit to City Manager Marc Ott that he included her among the finalists). The OPM has grown up under Brown's tenure; his successor needs to maintain the momentum and build upon it so that a strong public role in police oversight becomes uncontroversial business as usual.

Medicaid and the Lege: Throw 'Em in the Street?

In the fires of the fall election campaign, no single topic blazed hotter than **health care**, as Republicans stoked voter fury with talk of "death panels" and "Obamacare." Now, Texas Republicans are backing away from rhetoric about dumping Medicaid as a new state report finds that leaving it would cost the state far more to do far less.

In 2009, the Legislature requested that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission and the Texas Department of Insurance issue a report on the benefits and perils of quitting Medicaid. That report, "Impact on Texas If Medicaid Is Eliminated," was released on Dec. 3. If hardcore conservatives were hoping it would provide ammunition for their campaign against the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 (aka federal health care reform), they quickly found it was shooting blanks. On average per month in 2009, 3.3 million Texans relied on Medicaid for health insurance or long-term care, while another 450,000 used the companion Children's Health Insurance Program. Texas already leads the nation in uninsured citizens; if it drops Medicaid, the authors warned, 2.6 million of those Medicaid and CHIP recipients could find themselves uninsured. That's another 2.6 million Texans faced with an impossible decision: go to the doctor and risk a crippling bill, or don't go and risk their health. The report also found that, contrary to some anti-immigrant rhetoric, Medicaid is not being swamped by undocumented foreigners. While immigrants are three times more likely than Texas citizens to be uninsured, they only accounted for less than 1%

The report further confirmed that while the state would gain more flexibility in how it spends its own cash, it would lose billions in federal reimbursements. In turn, patients no longer covered by Medicaid would turn to emergency rooms as their primary health care. Not only would Texas lose the additional \$2.3 billion it receives from the feds as Medicaid providers to cover that uncompensated health care, but the counties mandated to provide these services would bear another \$4 billion a year in costs.

Anne Dunkelberg, associate director of the Center for Public Policy Priorities, said that if conservatives try to claim that ending Medicaid makes financial sense, "The math doesn't work at all." Although the state Medicaid budget is expected to reach \$30 billion in 2011, 60% of those costs will be reimbursed by the federal government. If Texas instead goes its own way, it would still have to pay for residential care for the elderly and people with disabilities out of the overstretched general revenue budget. Dunkelberg described the anti-Medicaid offensive as just "a new wrinkle

in resistance" to health care reform rather than a movement grounded in fiscal responsibility.

Much of that resistance has been based on a brief 2009 paper, "Medicaid Meltdown," by conservative think tank the Heritage Foundation. Its authors claimed that killing Medicaid would save states a trillion dollars over the next decade. Against that background, regular Heritage Foundation speaker Gov. Rick Perry infamously called Medicaid a Ponzi scheme "that would make Mr. Ponzi feel bad." However, shortly after the release of the Health and Human Services report, Perry issued a statement saying his interest was simply in "increasing flexibility and innovation in Medicaid." Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, fired back that the report demonstrated that GOP schemes to cut Medicaid would be a "fool's errand [that would] hurt our elderly, disabled, and low-income children."


However, the possibility remains that any upcoming clash on the legislative floor may not be between Democrats and Republicans, but between senior legislators and a freshman class of conservative ideologues. The first indication of this shift may have come at a Dec. 3 freshman orientation event, when a panel including House Public Health Committee Chair Lois

> Kolkhorst, R-Brenham, and Senate Higher Education Committee Chair Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, taught new lawmakers Medicaid 101. In this state,

Medicaid only covers children, pregnant women, people 65 and older, people with disabilities, and low-income families with children. In 2007, 70% of Medicaid recipients were children. It also covers 48% of all nursing home care costs and pays for the majority of school nurses and graduate medical training positions.

With those facts on the table, Kolkhorst and Zaffirini hinted at common ground that could appeal to Democratic fears about Big Pharma's powerful role in health care spending while appeasing Republican demands for increased self-reliance. The most pressing health care issues, Zaffirini noted, are not how much money is being spent, but where. Tackling childhood obesity through nutritional education may cost more in the short term, but it's the same kind of trade-off as childhood inoculation; that is, it's better to spend the money on immunization now than face an epidemic later. However, as HHS Executive Commissioner Thomas Suehs told the freshmen, "The Legislature tends not to want to fund preventative programs." Again, that's where political dogma may cripple common sense and consensus. "If we propose mandating the teaching of nutrition in medical school," said Zaffirini, "people say we're micromanaging."

Kolkhorst says the idea of dropping out of Medicaid is still not off the table. With a \$20 billion to \$28 billion projected deficit,

legislators will have to look at every state agency and program. Addressing the current political reality, Kolkhorst continued, "We have a very large freshmen class that won in a sweeping manner on mostly bashing the Obama administration and the health care bill." Combine that with the deficit forecast, and it seems inevitable that some form of Medicaid legislation will reach the floor this session. There's a steep learning curve ahead for the dogmatists. "Much of our constituency is demanding, 'Cut expenses, cut expenses, cut expenses," Kolkhorst said, "and then when we do it, they really meant, 'Cut everything, but don't cut my program." She warned: "If we opt out of Medicaid, we opt out of all of those programs. We couldn't cherry-pick."

Voter education on that point is already proceeding. On Nov. 20, House Appropriations Committee Chair Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, told an Ellis County tea party meeting that if Medicaid goes, "We will have to throw some people out in the street." Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, called Pitts a "very honest broker" on the issue but feared how unreceptive health care reform opponents may be. A former critical care nurse, Howard said, "I'm still hearing from some people that everyone should be able to take care of themselves, and that if we didn't provide health care that they would be taken care of by the philanthropic and faith communities." - Richard Whittaker

Republicans Denied a Supermajority (Again)

Remember election night? Remember how the Republicans took the Texas House of Representatives 99-51? That math could still change with two Central Texas seats including one in Travis County - still not fully resolved.

On Nov. 2, incumbent Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, held House District 48 in western Travis County by 16 votes over GOP challenger Dan **Neil**. Cue the inevitable recount. demanded by the Neil campaign. When the numbers came in on Dec. 2, Neil actually picked up one vote, bringing his total to 25,011, while Howard fell by three to 25,023. That's a narrower victory for Howard,

but still a victory - and a vital one for the Democrats. If the Republicans held 100 seats, that supermajority could make them unstoppable and render the Democrats effectively irrelevant in Texas politics. They couldn't even repeat the famous 2003 quorum-busting trip to Ardmore, Okla. (see "The House Adjourns to Oklahoma," May 16, 2003), Howard's win means they retain that nuclear option, at least in theory.

However, Neil's campaign has yet to concede, instead raising questions about straight-ticket ballots cast by absentee voters living overseas indefinitely. Even though these nonresidents are allowed to vote only in federal races, on recount night Neil's campaign suggested that their ballots should count in HD 48. The peril for Democrats is that if Neil does file a challenge, it would be heard by the Legislature. At first glance, that would appear to mean the Republican House Caucus could vote itself that supermajority, but Howard's attorney, Buck Wood, said, "The most they can do is to allow [Neil] a new election." And, he added. if the Legislature were to count those nonresident ballots in HD 48, "Howard would win by 20."

While Neil's campaign ponders strategy in Travis County, another House race is still being fought 50 miles south in Guadalupe County, where the Nov. 4 death of Rep. Edmund Kuempel, R-Seguin, triggered a special election to be held Dec. 14. The traditionally safe GOP seat is now embroiled in a 10-way race - with seven Republicans, two Democrats, and a Libertarian - that could throw the accepted math into total disarray, and there's already disunity in the GOP ranks. The Young Conservatives of Texas and fundamentalist revisionist historian David Barton are backing Myrna McLeroy. Edmund's son John Kuempel has picked up two big-name endorsements: Bennie Bock, who preceded Edmund in the seat, and Texas Rangers co-owner Nolan Ryan. Hopefully, this will all be settled before the House reconvenes at noon on Jan. 11. - R.W.





Aponte Found, Money Gone

As reported in "Headlines" last week, **Louanne Aponte**, the former head of the **Family Connections** nonprofit who is

accused of embezzling more than \$300,000 from that organization, turned herself in last week. As it turns out, the damage she allegedly wrought was even worse than originally thought. According to the indictment handed down against her, Aponte actually stole more than \$1 million, not only from Family Connections, but also from another nonprofit as well as from her church, Hyde **Park Christian Church**.

As suspected, Aponte had fled to Venezuela once improprieties in Family Connections' bookkeeping were discovered earlier this year. Her husband had relatives in that country, and the Statesman reported that she went there with a mere \$3,500 in her pocket. According to Aponte's attor-

ney, the rest of the money she took is gone – all spent. At this time, it's not clear why she voluntarily returned to the United States and surrendered.

Holly VanScoy did contract work for Family
Connections as an external evaluator of its federally funded Collaboration to
Reduce Abandonment and Deliver Local Education and Support program, or
CRADLES, for more than half a decade and saw the

inside of the organization as it imploded. "First there was a lot of disbelief, people wanting it to be something other than what it actually was," VanScoy told the *Chronicle*.

"It was staff members trying to think, 'What else could have happened?' to explain it. And it was increasingly clear over a very short period that it was what it looked like. It was an embezzlement. The money was gone, and the agency was going to go down.

"I think the biggest lesson of the whole debacle is the inability of [Family Connections' board of directors], that the board itself was not in control of that agency. There's supposed to be a balance of power so that any one director cannot bring down an agency. ... When Louanne left, they appointed neither an interim director nor did they put anybody in charge of the finances for a full month.

"This is a woman who was an embezzler when she came," said VanScoy, referring to Aponte's previous criminal record, which escaped scrutiny when Family Connections first hired her in 1990; at the time, she was on parole for a theft conviction from 1987. "It's a great case study for anybody who's in the nonprofit field of how vulnerable you are when there's just one person with her hands in everything."

Stalled Hearing Put Death Penalty on Trial

Lawyers in Harris County District Judge Kevin Fine's courtroom were set to prove this week that Texas' imposition of the death penalty is capricious - so much so as to risk the execution of an innocent person. But on Dec. 7, the hearing was put on hold after the state Court of Criminal Appeals issued a stay in the proceedings. Early this year, Fine ruled Texas' use of the death penalty unconstitutional, but after Gov. Rick Perry and Attorney General Greg Abbott balked - and Abbott called Fine an "activist" judge - Fine rescinded the order and instead set this hearing, requested by lawyers of capital defendent John Edward Green. Green is charged with killing a woman during a 2008 robbery in Houston; his lawyers say he's innocent. The proceedings began Monday with testimony about the prevalence of wrongful convictions in Texas and about the risk factors that lead to them - including faulty eyewitness identification (implicated in more than 75% of Texas' wrongful convictions), which Green's lawyers say plays a part in their client's case. Prosecutors stood mute during the hearing, on orders from Harris County District Attorney Pat Lykos, reports the Houston Chronicle. Then they appealed to the CCA, which has now stepped in to halt the hearing until lawyers for both sides can file briefs on whether the proceeding should be allowed to continue at all. Green's lawyers said Tuesday they were disappointed that the CCA had stopped the hearing, which was set to last two weeks. "The claim by Mr. Green is based on a constitutional theory never before examined by the Texas courts and derives from the mounting evidence demonstrating that the kind of evidence against Mr. Green ... is often inaccurate and leads to conviction of the innocent," they said. "We have confidence that when the [CCA] fully appreciates the evidence and the constitutional claim, it will allow the hearing to resume." For more on this, see "Is Death Unconstitutional?" Sex Abuse Appeal Goes to Texas Supremes

Lawyers for **Michael Arena**, who in 1999 was convicted of sexually abusing his then-7-year-old cousin – a crime that his cousin maintains never happened – are asking the **Texas Supreme Court** to review a lower court decision denying the now 27-year-old's appeal. At issue, in part, is whether the expert testimony of psychologist **Fred Willoughby** was improperly allowed as evidence at the teenager's sentencing hearing. Allowing that ruling to stand, they argue, would jeopardize countless future cases involving expert testimony.

Willoughby testified that a psychological examination called the "**Abel Assessment**" had been tested and was accurate to determine the sexual preferences of juveniles. According to Willoughby, the test was credible and, in Arena's case, demonstrated that the teen – 14 years old at the time of the alleged crime – had an attraction to young girls the age of his cousin, Stephanie. According to the assessment, said Willoughby, Arena was likely a "pedophile" and would probably reoffend if not sent to prison.

As it happened, however, the test had not been demonstrated to be effective for juveniles, and Willoughby was subsequently sanctioned in 2002 by the **Texas State Board of Examiners of Psychologists** in part for his "failure to substantiate forensic opinions" offered in the Arena case. That information was not available to Arena's jury, which handed the juvenile 20 years in prison.

The trial court denied Arena's direct appeal of the case, as did the state 3rd Court of Appeals. In its opinion this summer, the appeals court agreed with the trial court that even if Willoughby had testified falsely, it didn't impact the jury. Now, in an

appeal filed Nov. 23, Arena's lawyer **Clinton Broden** of Dallas is asking the Supremes to reconsider the 3rd Court's position. The appeals court's "mishandling" of the standard for allowing expert testimony is so egregious, he argues, that to allow it to remain uncorrected would negatively impact hundreds of other cases to come. "To argue that Willoughby's testimony did not result in a longer sentence strains the limit of reason," Broden wrote.

The state has waived its right to respond to the latest appeal, Broden wrote in an e-mail to the *Chronicle*. Still, the court accepts very few such petitions for review, so there is no guarantee that they will even take the case, he said.

Meanwhile, Arena has been denied for parole each time he's come up as eligible, primarily because he refuses to admit guilt; unless he is granted relief by the courts, he is unlikely to be released until 2019. (For more on the story, see "Criminally Innocent," Nov. 5.)

HELLO. VIETNAM!

Several of America's top high tech giants are now breaking with conventional thinking on the offshoring of their factories and jobs, asking a heretofore unthinkable question: "Who needs China?"

"Let's invest in new, state-of-the-art factories," they declare excitedly. "We'll launch a bold new initiative to train tens of thousands of teachers who, in turn, will educate the high tech work force of the future, generating a wave of jobs and making our American corporations the most competitive in the world!"

Wow, what vision: what a boost to America's middle class possibilities!

Uh ... America? Who said anything about the USA? No, no, the high tech powerhouses are not decamping from China to reinvest in our country - instead, they are shifting their production to Vietnam. It seems that the millionaire chieftains of Silicon Valley now deem the price of China's low-wage workers to be too high, and their wandering eyes have settled on Vietnam, where the per capita income is less than half that of the Chinese people.

Thus, on Oct. 29, Intel CEO Paul Otellini stood in a packed auditorium in Ho Chi Minh City and hollered out, "Hello, Vietnam." He was there for the dedication of Intel's sparkling, billion-dollar chip factory, which has a clean room the size of five football fields and employs 4,000 workers. Also, Intel is trying to realign Vietnam's educational system to be more corporate-friendly, pouring money into the training of 87,000 teachers.

Hewlett-Packard is another world-wanderer moving to Vietnam, having built a facility there for outsourcing its software engineering work. Wouldn't it be nice, in these times of middle-class decline in America, if the high tech honchos who benefit so lavishly from our country were to move more of their investments and jobs here?

FEE-BRAINED AIRLINES

Why do airline executives hate their customers? Not so very long ago, airlines boasted about flying "the friendly skies." These days, a more apt rendition of that happy slogan would be flying "the abusive skies."

For example, what does a ticket cost? The airlines won't come clean on even this basic question. We do know that stated ticket prices have been steadily rising, with double-digit increases in the past year.

But that price is merely the starting point for today's airline hucksters. The real gouging is in the frenzy of fees that airlines have invented, many of which are not even disclosed to us and most of which are simply unwarranted. Last year, airline fees totaled nearly \$8 billion - a consumer subsidy siphoned right out of our pockets into the corporate coffers.

Take the "ticket change" fee. If something comes up, forcing you to change a flight from the one you've booked, you're hit with a service fee of \$150, plus you must pay the difference if your new flight is priced higher (which it will be). What a rip-off! This rebooking "service" is done by computer, costing the airline more like a buck-fifty, rather than a hundred and fifty. Also, notice that airlines themselves routinely cancel or delay our flights, forcing us into inconvenient and thoroughly unpleasant travel changes - yet they don't pay us \$150 for their changes.

American Airlines, however, has generously offered to cut its rebooking fee in half - if you pay a "flexibility" fee of \$19 when you book your flight. Then, any changes you need to make later will only cost you \$75. Yes, it's a fee to reduce your fee!

These nasty gouges are infuriating and unnecessary. Southwest Airlines, though. refuses to charge for any service that has historically been free to customers - and Southwest has consistently stayed profitable.



RAMIN NAZER

Jokesmith in the on-deck circle

"Hi, I'm Ramin Nazer. Thank you for coming to my stand-up comedy" is how this local 26-year-old rising talent sometimes begins his set. In May, Ramin (pronounced "Rahmeen") placed second in the 25th annual Funniest Person in Austin contest, and he's as much a booster of the Austin comedy scene as an onstage fixture who has distinguished himself with inventive joke-writing chops and an absurdist non sequitur style. That style landed him an official South by Southwest showcase and an appearance on an Independent Film Channel comedy panel earlier this year, as well a gig this past Thanksgiving weekend opening for white-hot comedian/writer Chelsea Peretti at the Addision Improv near Dallas. That's in addition to his occasional Velveeta Room one-off appearances and his ongoing stand-up showcase, Live at ColdTowne, Friday nights.

Nazer, who is secretly Canadian and retains dual American-Canadian citizenship, has been doing stand-up for just over three years. At the mic, he projects confidence without a braving cockiness and exudes playful enthusiasm. With a comedic sensibility akin to that of the late Mitch Hedberg - his most obvious influence - Nazer constructs his act on the foundations that brevity is the soul of wit and onstage segues are for the weak. He also likes toying with the fourth wall: "unexpected surrealism, radical shifts in tone," disrupting an established rhythm, and consciously using the same polite cadence when doing raunchier fare. Still, his act isn't a deliberate exercise in meta. Nazer admits that for him, the mother of invention is a bit of insecurity and the desire to preemptively step on potential audience side comments. He adds: "I've found when I'm on a show where a lot of people are just doing okay and they don't break the fourth wall at all, when I go up I

tend to do better in those type of scenarios – when it's like shaking things up. But if other people are doing well, then sometimes it's the opposite, and then I don't do well: 'We just want to watch the comedy; why does he have to break it apart for us?'"

But Nazer just has a proclivity for tinkering. Recently at a Live at ColdTowne show (a fantastic mix of train wreck newbies and seasoned pros), he extrapolated how often the average man thinks about zebra sex and about nerds' revenge: "I noticed high school- and college-age girls, they don't go after the nice guys. They go after the bad boys and the jocks. But then something changes after college, and they get a little older, and they start dating and marrying nerds. It's interesting how that shift happens. So in the end, nerds win! Sorry bad boys, the older, fatter versions of your girlfriends belong to us!"

Another of Nazer's ambitions is to "make jokes where the punch line comes before you think it would, and also it's not one you would think of in your first 10 guesses." This brings to mind his time-release gem: "Here's what the world would be like if there were no slogans: Monday Night Football on Fox is brought to you by McDonald's ... McDonald's."

Nazer's m.o. is to grow the community through his ColdTowne showcase and the (admittedly somewhat dormant) www.lastgas comedy.com website that he co-founded with comedian Albert Im. "I believe in making your own opportunities," he says. "I like doing stand-up, and I like organizing my own shows, and there's no reason to go to New York and start from the bottom."

'COMPANY'

After a long wait, 'Phone rings, door chimes ...'

As the international celebrations surrounding his 80th birthday have made abundantly clear, Stephen Sondheim is nigh unto a god in the world of musicals. But universal adoration doesn't necessarily translate into frequent production, at least not locally. Of the dozen musicals for which Sondheim has written both music and lyrics, more than half have been produced in Austin just once or never, with the rest staged at most three or four times over a span of decades. Even among his signature works, it's not uncommon for 10 years or more to pass between revivals. Take Company – it's a breakthrough work for Sondheim and an immensely influential musical, but the last time it was mounted in town, Rick Perry was still the Democratic state representative from Haskell County.

That kind of lengthy gap leaves some of our finest musical-theatre talents champing at the bit where Sondheim's concerned. Laura Powell, the award-winning star of the

Zilker summer musical productions of Annie Get Your Gun and Once Upon a Mattress, remembers a conversation with actress Molly Wissinger on just that topic when they were performing Disney's Beauty and the Beast on the hillside, and at the mention of Company, Wissinger said, "That show needs to be done." Powell didn't require convincing. She'd been hooked on the show - in fact, on all of the composer's shows - since 1986, when she was in Simply Sondheim: The Musical Story, a revue created by a group of

her musical-theatre pals. (By her own admission, Powell was "raised on Rodgers and Hammerstein," and the night they said, "Hey, let's write a musical revue about Stephen Sondheim," she didn't know who he was.) The show earned seven B. Iden Payne Award nominations that year, took home the prize for outstanding musical production, and enjoyed four revivals, but the big takeaway for Powell was her connection to the music of Sondheim. "His soundtrack is the soundtrack of my life," she says. "It is my touchstone for past references both personal and professional." As she watched the recent PBS broadcast of Sondheim: The Birthday Concert, "Every song brought back a memory," she says. "I was sitting on my couch with a box of Kleenex completely reliving my 'salad days.' I think I cried through the entire performance."

So when Michael McKelvey invited Powell to join a revival of *Company* he was producing, she was in. Immediately. And she didn't hesitate when asked which role she'd like to play: Joanne, the cynic who casts a (vodka) gimlet eye on Manhattan society matrons in "The Ladies Who Lunch." "God, she's so inappropriate and awful, but you gotta love her!" Powell says. "She says whatever she wants to say and the hell with the consequences!"

That was, pun intended, music to McKelvey's ears: "There were a number of very well-known Austin actresses I had in mind for the role, but Laura was definitely my first choice. I think of Joanne as a true 'broad,' strong in her convictions, truthful, and not afraid of the world because she has faced it on so many fronts and in so many ways. I wanted someone who would be honest on- and offstage, call me out if she disagreed with something, but be willing to try


a different tack. In all my years of working with her, I found Laura to be warm, funny, pointed, creative, energetic, but above all honest ... in her opinion, conviction, and performance."

In addition to Powell, McKelvey has secured the talents of several gifted musical-theatre performers, including Andrew Cannata (Rent), Libby Dees (Parade), Amy Downing (The 25th Annual **Putnam County** Spelling Bee), Kirk German (Annie), Joe Hartman (MilkMilkLemonade), Leslie Hollingsworth (I'll Be Seeing You),

David Ponton (Disney's Beauty and the Beast) and, yes, Molly Wissinger. McKelvey's Doctuh Mistuh Productions, which last brought you Evil Dead: The Musical, will donate proceeds from the six-performance run to the Breast Cancer Resource Center of Austin.

So how is it for Powell slipping back into Company again after 24 years? "Working through Sondheim's insane and completely nonintuitive harmonies, which at times makes me say awful things about his mother and makes my brain want to explode, still gives me more joy than any other musical composer I have ever worked with," she says. "I count my blessings every time I get to sing Sondheim." — Robert Faires

On the third Thursday of each month, the lobby of the Salvage Vanguard Theater reveals a tableau of living art known as butoh. As different from the more familiar Western forms of modern dance as an arsenic-based life-form is from our own human biology, butoh's ancient Japanese paradigm of movement is re-engineered here by a shifting combination of dancers Ellen Bartel, Mari Akita, Caroline Sutton Clark, and musician Adam Sultan. This particular Spank Dance Company initiative has been unfolding its wonders for four years, for free, in various venues around town.

"It started when Mari and I did a modeling session at David Ohlerking's Austin Figurative Gallery," says Spank Dance Company's Ellen Bartel. "And instead of just nude figures, we decided to do butoh – with costumes and paint and everything. We didn't do still poses; we moved throughout the entire session. And when we got done, I told David that that was one of my favorite things in the world to do and I would do it every day if I could. And he said, 'Well, why don't you?' And I said, 'Well, maybe not every day,' and from that point on, we did it once a month with David. Mari and I did it briefly by ourselves, and then we invited Caroline, because she's performed butoh professionally."

Austin Chronicle: And, out of all the musicians in Austin to work with, why Adam Sultan?

Ellen Bartel: 'Cause he's my friend!

Adam Sultan: Nothing to do with my talent. Bartel: Adam's really good at improvising in an organic way that's similar to how we perform. He's sensitive to movement in the space around him, as opposed to somebody who can improvise but stays mostly in their own head. Adam's capable of opening his field of vision. Sultan: I took it as a challenge, something beyond my usual comfort zone. Butoh has a sense of trying to remove the conventions of modern dance and yet still trying to express something. It's the most satisfying improv music I've ever done, because it's so spacious and inviting.

AC: So you got Adam on board, and it was off to SVT for the four of you?

Caroline Sutton Clark: Before SVT, David lost his studio and there was a performance in a stable.

Bartel: We went from the Figurative Gallery to where David lived in the horse stable to when he was in the office space Downtown. We did, like, four or five performances there, which was weird, because it was an actual

office space – a long hallway and small reception area, with other businesses around us. And then we went to SVT in, I think, '08.

AC: And are these performances what people would recognize as traditional butoh?

Sutton Clark: It's the intersection of where we're all coming from, and I'd definitely put it under the butoh umbrella. Butoh has a vast array of styles; it's a rending-open of creative energy, so you can put a lot of different things under that banner. It's different from modern dance in its look, in the form it takes. Even improvisational modern dance has a real emphasis on form in terms of aesthetic structures; the use of space and time tends to be very Westernized. Butoh has a real different sense of time - in the sense of tempo but also in compositional structures of time and in the form that takes. Butoh is more organically motivated than architecturally motivated. There's a real connection to chaos theory and quantum mechanics that are more in the Eastern realm of thought.

The next butoh performance by Spank Dance Company will be Thursday, Dec. 16, 7-7:30pm, at Salvage Vanguard Theater, 2803 Manor Rd. For more information, call 474-7886 or visit www.spankdance.com.

LONG, LAST, HAPPY: NEW AND SELECTED STORIES

Grove Press, 464 pp., \$27.50

A Yarp is a terrifying, spindle-legged, people-eating monster that prowls the Ozarks in human disguise. Young Roonswent Dover, narrator of Barry Hannah's supremely creepy short story "Evening of the Yarp: A Report by

Roonswent Dover," describes the creature thusly: "A Yarp's eyes of course is suppose to be hot yellow and his skin disappeared from his throat so you can see its tongue long in it and tonsils and open voice box." And if that sounds pretty unattractive, just wait till the Yarp opens his coat and reveals "all his digestion, everthing he's eaten all chewed and gravyed-up in them tubes and holds and glands."

It makes you wonder: Why did Barry Hannah even bother writing about ordinary people when he wrote so well about imaginary monsters?

"Evening of the Yarp" is reason enough to read Long, Last, Happy, Hannah's post-humous volume of selected short stories, but there are plenty of others. The last four stories in the book, all new, tell an interconnected tale of Gulf War veterans and church-burning. Linked tales of pyromania in the South will always edge very quickly into

Faulkner territory (Snopes trilogy, anyone?), and Hannah makes the obligatory tip of the hat in the first story, "Fire Water": "both of them had worked in the shadow of this statue. Faulkner. Damn the organ tones, the way he wrote like an octopus with pencils." And as in Faulkner, this suite of stories doesn't end well.

Hannah himself pulled some octopuswith-pencils feats over the course of his

distinguished career, and plenty of the stories in this collection showcase his wit, his humor, and an ear finely tuned to the myriad dialects of the South. This is not to say that every story is a rollicking romp through Dixie – there are quiet, sad moments, too, and tales of truly desperate and pathetic people.

If you're a person who enjoys language, sex, and guns, you will

probably like this book. If you're a person who enjoys mythical Ozarkian monsters who flash their roiling guts and smell "of bull spunk and road kill," you will also probably like this book. Look elsewhere if you're in the mood for spare or subtle prose, but if you want to spend a few hours in the company of somebody who wrote like he enjoyed the hell out of life, this isn't a bad place to start.

GREAT HOUSE by Nicole Krauss W. W. Norton

There's such poetry in Nicole Krauss' prose it's hard to resist underlining huge swaths of text; I still have scraps of paper tacked to my office wall from her 2006 novel, the magisterial *The History* of Love.

Great House, which was nominated for a National Book Award in October, is a more somber thing. It follows four narratives with one connective strand: a large, manydrawered writing desk that is passed between hands throughout the novel. In the first section, the desk takes on mystical qualities for a New York-based writer who inherited it from a Chilean poet named

Daniel Varsky; when she returns the desk to a stranger claiming to be Varksy's daughter, its sudden absence stunts her ability to write. In the second section, a grieving widower in Israel confronts his emotionally fragile son. In the third, another newly widowed man tries to make sense of the murky past of his dead wife, an experimental writer who fled Germany in a Kindertransport just before the war. And in the fourth storyline, set in London, an Oxford scholar falls in with a pair of dramatically isolated siblings (shades of *Les Enfants Terribles*) whose controlling father, an antiques dealer, has made finding the desk his life's work.

A book sunk in mystery, Great House is like a nesting egg that skips generations, with some riddles never to be solved, much as the narrators' efforts to crack the codes of their inscrutable loved ones almost always end in failure. Krauss charts the life cycle of love in alternating chapters - new love, lost love, and lovelessness. In the last, in which the long-single New York writer makes a pilgrimage to Israel to reclaim the desk, Krauss presents a brutalizing portrait of a middle-aged woman reawakening to desire to disastrous effect. It's the least pleasurable chapter but also the most potent in a book that is both challenging and – in its very best stretches – ravishing, too. – *Kimberley Jones*

DANCING IN HEAVEN How can you not give a "10" to every one of the participants in Dancing With the Stars Austin? TCM'ING I've spent seemingly endless hours watching TCM - a treasure trove of Hollywood fashion. I've been especially focused on designer Edith Head. She won eight Academy Awards - more than any other woman has - and was nominated every year from 1948 through 1966. She reflected the eras she worked in from 1924 to her death in 1981. Her clothes weren't always the most incredibly original designs, but she approached design much more analytically than emotionally. Incredibly, she knew just how to calculate and manipulate emotion through her work. Exhibiting little skill and no experience, she used "borrowed" sketches to land a job as an artist at Paramount where she worked for the next 44 years. She created glorious ensembles for Mae West, Barbara Stanwyck, Rita Hayworth, Marlene Dietrich, and Elizabeth **Taylor**. Her costumes were dazzlingly iconic: Gloria Swanson in Sunset Boulevard, melding both the fashions of the Twenties and the Fifties: Grace Kelly in To Catch a Thief: and Bette Davis in All About Eve to name a few. Lucy Gallant features brilliant actress Jane **Wyman** founding a Texas department store suspiciously akin to Neiman Marcus. The highlight of the movie is Edith Head appearing as herself in a lavish Neiman's-worthy fashion show. The black dress that Audrey Hepburn wore in Breakfast at Tiffany's is legendary,

but it is not Edith's work. She was not above



copying someone else's work (in this case, the work of Givenchy). But at least she copied the best. What an incredible legacy she's left us.

POST-HOLIDAY A member of my research team tried out a new product called the **Mother** Tucker - a horrible name for a very good product. It is compression shape-wear particularly designed to help new mothers firm up after childbirth (though it certainly has appeal for anyone who wants to look firmer and slimmer). A tank designed with bands of extra compression in strategic areas, the MT certainly does what it promises ... though it also flattens the bust, which may or may not be a plus. Our research assistant suggested that the company, Belly Bandit (www.bellybandit.com) - another unappetizing name - develop a variation cut out under the bust. Though the bands-of-compression technique isn't new, the Mother Tucker is among the very best of it's kind.

Holiday Wines: Bubbles Without Breaking the Bank

Although a few Italians and Burgundians might disagree, most everyone agrees that the French from the tiny appellation of Champagne make the best sparkling wines in the world. Unfortunately, they also make the

most expensive. To get better value, the best bargains in bubbly are from Spain.

There, the wines made in the same method as the Champenoise are called **Cava**. The **Ferrers**, one of the great families of Spanish wine, are responsible for many of the countries' finest sparkling wines, including Freixenet and Segura Viudas.

Freixenet Cordon Negro (\$11, but often less than \$10 during the holidays) is made for the casual drinker, one looking for a good wine at a rock-bottom price. The balance of acidity and sweetness is always right and works equally well for standing around chatting or having with a rich meal. Freixenet also offers their Cordon Rosado (also \$11, but often less than \$10 during the holidays), a version that's a bit fruitier and has a mere kiss of sugar, just enough for the folks who find sparkling wines too austere.

The Ferrers' other principal sparkling winery is Segura Viudas. Their **Brut Reserva** (\$10, but again, often less) is an amazing bargain for cost counters, with beautiful apple-and-toast aromas and a delicious taste. The top of the line for the Ferrer family's Cavas is **Segura Viuda Reserva Heredad** (\$27, occasionally less during holidays). This wine is fully competitive with Champagne, and given its five years of bottle-aging, the ruthless paring of grapes they consider less than perfect, and its heavy and distinctive bottle, it must be a miracle for the Ferrers to make any money from it at all!

Noble Pig Sandwiches

On a blustery Saturday in November, I packed my family into the car and headed north in search of a recently opened sandwich shop called Noble Pig. By the time we emerged from a frustratingly sticky traffic snarl emanating from Lakeline Mall and made several U-turns in search of the tiny cafe, we pulled up to the storefront feeling annoyed and famished. Central Austinites beware: Noble Pig is a fair jaunt from home. But for residents of Cedar Park and North Austin, I have these words to say: lucky you.

Noble Pig is one of those rare eateries with complete integrity. Everything here is not only made from scratch but made with love. Owners **John Bates** (formerly of **Wink** and **Asti**) and **Brandon Martinez** (formerly of Whole Foods) fled the fine-dining scene to start their own venture selling artisanal sandwiches and charcuterie. "We wanted to take a tired concept, the deli, and

breathe new life into it," says Bates. Toward that end, Bates and Martinez bake their own bread, cure their own meats, and make all their own condiments, slaws, and sides.

As the name suggests, the menu is centered on all things swiney pork belly, pork sausage, bacon, and pulled pork. These are the cornerstones of Noble Pig's repertoire. The Noble Pig sandwich (\$8), crafted with house-made ham, bacon, pulled pork, and melted provolone on toasted bread, is not to miss. I devoured my Sando (\$7), a daily special sandwich made of crisp, salty pork belly, chipotle aioli, fried egg, and tomatoes. But don't shy away from pigless outliers such as the house-cured duck pastrami (\$8) or the Cajun-spiced catfish with tomato tartar sauce (\$8) because these too are exceptionally tasty.

This quaint blue-and-white-checked cafe is open for breakfast and lunch only. The menu is manageable and doesn't overreach. As business owners, Bates and Martinez are taking baby steps for now, but it's clear their footing is solid. — Rachel Feit

I'd be hard-pressed to recall an Austin November/December with more new restaurant activity. Out near the lake, a second outlet of Uncle Billy's Brew & Que (6550 Comanche Trail Ste. B-201, 266-0111) is serving handcrafted brews and barbecue, next to Houston chef Robert Del Grande's new Soleil (6550 Comanche Trail Ste. B-101, 266-0600), which takes its inspiration from Italy and the Mediterranean. Both eateries share the same dramatic Lake Travis sunset views as the **Oasis**. Also look for **Sobani** (1700 RR 620 N., 266-3900), a midpriced bistro from chef Jon Gaboric that serves dinner daily and lunch every day but Saturday. Farther up the road, check out the custom wedding cakes and fine pastries at Michelle's Patisserie (12233 RR 620 N., 433-6860, www.michellespatisserie.com).

Meanwhile, **South Austin** is buzzing about the new dining opportunities in the Austinville **78704** development, where you can get great tacos at Papalote Taco House (2803 S. Lamar, 804-2472) and enjoy the very healthy combination of fresh juice drinks paired with piping hot servings of distinctive soups at the **Juicebox** & Soup Peddler (2801 S. Lamar, 444-SOUP). Next door is a new Phil's Icehouse/Amy's Ice Creams tandem: burgers and those Austintatious frozen treats (2901 S. Lamar). In the Bouldin Creek area, be sure to try the Frenchinspired pastries at La Pâtisserie by Luxe Sweets (602 W. Annie, 912-0033) created by Kitchen Space owner Soraiya Nagree. Also check out New India Cuisine (2304 S. Congress, 445-9727), which has taken up residence in the old Richard Jones barbecue location.

There are several eagerly awaited restaurant openings scheduled to take place **Downtown** this month, all dependent on final permitting and inspections. The new **W Hotel** (200 Lavaca) is scheduled to open this week, including the restaurant **Trace**. Around the corner at the **Austonian** (200 Congress), Executive Chef David Bull is optimistic that both his eateries, the upscale **Congress** and more casual **Second**, will be open before the end of the year. The eagerly anticipated **Haddingtons** (601 W. Sixth) from restaurateur Michael Polombo, chef Zack Northcutt, and bar master Bill Norris is also shooting for a pre-Christmas opening.

Foodways Texas (www.foodwaystexas.com) is a new cultural organization founded to study, document, and honor the culinary history and food traditions of the Lone Star State. Founding members include food writers, chefs, restaurateurs, farmers, ranchers, food artisans, brewers, and scholars. The organization, under the direction of Executive Director Marvin Bendele, will make its home at the University of Texas through an affiliation with the Division of Diversity and Community Engagement. Foodways Texas is slated to hold an annual educational symposium, create an independent film series focusing on Texas food traditions, and coordinate an oral history program documenting Texas foods. A local launch party for Foodways Texas will be held at Momo's (618 W. Sixth), noon-5pm this Saturday, Dec. 11, with food and music. As someone who missed chef Mizael Saucedo's cuisine when he left Bess Bistro, I was thrilled to hear of his appointment as general manager and executive chef at Urban at the Westin. The new eatery opened in March, offering upscale comfort American classics. The menu made an effort to include as many local ingredients as possible, which originally attracted me to the idea of dining at a hotel restaurant in the Domain. Saucedo's arrival sealed the deal. I'm happy to report that the chef has not skipped a beat, bringing his eco-friendly style and ethics with him. Despite a few kinks left to iron out, Urban is a worthwhile dining destination.

Shortly after Saucedo's arrival, we visited for dinner as he was rolling out a new menu, developed in concert with original Urban chef Bryce ESTAURANT Murphree. In fact, the voluptuous sweet corn reviews bisque (\$7) is his recipe, a rich and velvety puree of fresh corn garnished with roasted-corn pico de gallo, with a pervasive brown-butter flavor. We followed with two starters with local accents: a grilled Lockhart quail with green tomato chowchow, creamy grits, and guajillo honey glaze (\$11), and a Texas spinach salad with warm bacon vinaigrette, crisp lardons, fresh Parmesan cheese, and a sunny-side-up egg (\$10). We were wowed by the prime rib of Berkshire pork (\$23) glazed in caramelized soy sauce with sautéed apples, pearl onions, and wilted spinach. The salty-sweet-fatty combination was just dynamite, the meat cooked perfectly to medium on the rare side. The seared tuna (\$24) served with fingerling potatoes, asparagus, tomatoes, olives, and truffle vinaigrette was a bit of a letdown, however. In essence a Niçoise salad, it was dominated by truffle flavor and lacked balanced acidity. I would have preferred a simple citrus vinaigrette, perhaps with a hint of chile (which Saucedo uses masterfully). The extensive wine list is a bit California-centric, but changes are on the way, since Saucedo's goal is to offer better pairings for the food. For dessert we had an avocado tres leches cake so incredibly delicious that I asked for seconds - and I usually skip dessert.

Urban's lunch menu offers light fare: pizza, salads, sandwiches, and small entrées. The cornmeal-crusted fried green tomatoes filled with warm Gouda and piquillo peppers (\$8) could make a light meal paired with a cup of soup. I was thankfully swayed by the sweet, oceany jumbo scallops (\$14) sautéed in sage brown butter, served with a petit salad of hearts of palm, arugula, and white grapefruit segments. A glass of Hook and Ladder Gewürztraminer was the perfect accompaniment with its citrusy, mineral palate. The weekdayafternoon "My 512" happy hour offers a great deal with appetizers, signature cocktails, and local beers at special prices. From the cocktail menu - in which each bartender is credited for their creations - I absolutely loved the Pear Prosecco, made with fresh pear and brown sugar house-made syrup topped with amaretto and Prosecco, garnished with a thin

slice of pear spread with mascarpone cheese and roasted nuts. Bar nibbles include a beautifully presented tuna tartare (\$5), minced and tossed with a sesame-Sriracha aioli, layered with finely diced yellow tomato and avocado; tailgate chicken tenders (\$5), beer-battered and served with hot-sauce-laced ranch dressing; and a puremeat-no-filling lump crab cake (\$12) with avocado, micro-cilantro, and Dynamite sauce (another spicy mayo). The bar itself is elegant, ample, comfortable, and expertly tended.

Our visit for Sunday brunch didn't disappoint, either. The cute lox sliders (\$3 each), honey-wheat minimuffins topped with smoked salmon, fried quail eggs, spinach, and citrus hollandaise, are like miniature eggs Benedict. The humongous Urbanburger (\$12) is cooked to specified temperature and topped with barbecue sauce, onions, poblano peppers, and crimini mushrooms, served with salt-and-pepper fries. It left me in a meat coma, while my husband swore that the Big Biscuit (\$12), topped with creamy scrambled eggs, duck confit, chorizo, and bacon gravy, could probably cure even the worst hangover. Add a bloody beer made with homemade mix, and you're good to go for an afternoon of football on the couch.

My only complaint about Urban is that service is not quite there yet. Though the young staff is polite and eager, they obviously need more training, especially when it comes to wine sales. For example, when a diner asks, "Is the Gewürztraminer



dry or sweet?" the correct answer is, "Let me bring you a taste," instead of "I'm not a wine drinker." But given the recent changes, we can let that go for now, especially since we liked the food and ambience, and chef Saucedo is sure to guide the ship in the right direction. – Claudia Alarcón

For a restaurant reviewer, the possibility of turning the public on to an undiscovered gem is just too irresistible to pass up. So when a reader e-mailed me raving about the fried catfish he'd enjoyed at a well-hidden little breakfast and lunch spot near Mitchie's Gallery, I was intrigued. Finding the Southern Hospitality cafe tucked into a big North Austin business park required some hunting, but I soon discovered that the cozy eatery is aptly named. Proprietors Gail and Fred Warren are a friendly and hardworking young couple who know how to make their customers feel right at home. After his military career, Fred Warren spent many years working in institutional food service, most recently on the Huston-Tillotson campus. Now he's parlayed those years of experience into his own operation. Currently, Southern Hospitality serves breakfast and lunch weekdays, and the Warrens are available for on- and offsite catering on nights and weekends.

The affordable breakfast menu, available from 7 to 10am, includes breakfast tacos (\$1.59), sandwiches (\$1.79-2.59), French toast (\$2.79), and a big breakfast plate with eggs, potatoes, sausage, and a biscuit (\$3.99). At lunch, the regular menu features entrées, sandwiches, and a burger, as well as a fully-stocked, economical all-you-can-eat buffet (\$7.99) with two meat options that change daily, plus fresh salads, many (vegetarian) vegetable side dishes, pasta, and rice. Tuesday's buffet offers fried chicken and meat loaf, both worthy choices. Fred Warren's fried chicken is the real deal - bone-in breasts, thighs, wings, and drumsticks in a crackling golden-brown crust. The lean and hearty meat loaf has plenty of beefy flavor

but could benefit from the enhancement of a tomato sauce or mushroom gravy, in my opinion. We paired these meats with creamy mac and cheese, toothsome sautéed carrots, crunchy green beans, and white rice. We finished off the meal with moist slices of lemon-coconut and chocolate Bundt cake (\$1.79) – sweet and homey, perfect in keeping with the overall comfort food theme.

We returned for the catfish buffet on another visit and ate a pile of thin, crisp fillets with house-made tartar sauce, corn, buttery stewed cabbage, sautéed mushrooms, and spinach. The vegetables here are seasoned simply, each dish maintaining its texture and integrity. As much as we enjoyed the catfish, the highlight of that meal turned out to be the chicken and dumplings my guest ordered from the regular lunch menu. It's a soul-satisfying bowl of tender poached chunks of white meat bathed in a rich, creamy chicken broth with soft, flat dumpling pillows. At a mere \$3.99, this 10-ounce bowl of down-home goodness served with a buttery dinner roll is a sure contender for the best under-\$5 lunch in town.

The food at Southern Hospitality is simple and straightforward, satisfying and reasonably priced. The Warrens will treat you like a member of the family and send you back to work with a full stomach and money left in your wallet. Seek - Virginia B. Wood them out







BUMPY RIDE

Is 'Carnival Magic' the weirdest movie ever made for kids?

In the beginning, circa 1981, Carnival Magic was supposed to be a "kids' film:" whimsical, entertaining, semiprofitable. In the end, Carnival Magic screened barely at all; those who saw it were, shall we say, permanently nervous in the company of chimpanzees; and the film's director, Al Adamson, went missing, along with the film. Adamson wasn't known for his facility with children's films. He was a gutter auteur prone to cranking out drive-in and grindhouse fodder with rock 'em, shock 'em titles like Psycho a Go-Go, Satan's Sadists, and The Naughty Stewardesses (not to mention its follow-up. Blazing Stewardesses).

After trading his cinemania for a more prosaic life in real estate following the lukewarm-to-nonexistent reception of this, his one and only kids' film, Adamson was later found

murdered by a building contractor, his corpse entombed in cement beneath a new Jacuzzi. It was an ignoble end to an already spectacularly weird career, and the only existing print of Carnival Magic was presumed lost as well. But strange things happen.

"I didn't know about the movie until I already owned it," explains Alamo Drafthouse programmer Zack Carlson, who, as he says, stole a print of the film from his then-workplace, a fourth-run, dollar theatre in Olympia, Wash., that was closing. "Actually, my friend Jarod Warren, the projectionist, took it. It was an entire movie on one giant reel, and written on the side of it, in Sharpie, it said 'Carnival fucking Magic.'"

Cut to a month or so later: Carlson and friends screen the one-reel wonder for a handful of friends. "It completely decimated everyone. We couldn't understand what the movie was, because although it's made under the guise of a children's film, it features domestic abuse, vivisection, and, even more uncomfortably, it just has this pervasive air of stale, alcoholic uncles. It's the most quietly inappropriate kids' movie ever made. You can tell it was made by people who have never spent

any time around children."

Yes, but people who knew that if there's anything kids love more than borderline salacious dialogue, it's bor-

derline salacious dialogue delivered by a magical talking chimpanzee with a brassiere fetish.

Elvin Feltner, the film's producer and the man who penned its inscrutable five-page story treatment, is one of those people. Feltner, then as now the Florida-based owner of the largest independent film copyright library in the world - including such non-42nd Street fare as Frank Capra's Meet John Doe and Merchant Ivory's The Bostonians - considers himself a force for family entertainment in



a world where G- and PG-rated films are no longer the norm – hence his involvement with the innocuously titled Carnival Magic. (As it turns out, Feltner has nine other prints of Adamson's film, a fact which has done nothing to diminish Carlson's enthusiasm.)

"Some magazines in the Eighties called me the 'best new force for family entertainment,'" Feltner says, adding that he has "tried to do that all along. I think there's enough garbage in the media. It's kind of nice to have a film that's kind of uplifting and fun to enjoy."


Carnival Magic, like counting carnies' teeth and riding Tilt-a-Whirls on Robitussin, is nothing if not fun. (Film Chest/Vigil Films & Entertainment will release Carnival Magic on

DVD and Blu-ray on Jan. 25.) Populated by a ramshackle cast (including Maniac Cop 2's Joe Cirillo and Guiding Light stalwart Don Stewart) and possessed of a scuzzy, desperate undertone that's at once awful and aweinspiring, this just might be the strangest film Adamson ever made.

"I had planned on making a sequel," Feltner explains. "I was going to use the same cast and make something along the lines of Babe: Pig in the City, but with a chimp. It didn't happen."

"It's really a special movie," Carlson adds. "It's stunted and outrageously limited in many ways, but all the better for it. It's a beautiful example of somebody doing the wrong thing."

There's a certain unbendingness to film criticism, at least the kind of criticism that codas in a star rating or letter grade. But Roger Ebert – co-originator of that most famous of movie reviewer shorthands, the thumbs-up and -down - isn't embarrassed to admit when he got it wrong. In this third collection of his "Great Movies" essays (previously published on the Chicago Sun-Times website), Ebert reassesses classic films, which sometimes means redressing wrongheaded early reads (Killer of Sheep and Last Tango in Paris' Maria Schneider, for instance, are both rehabilitated here). That's a rare quality in a film critic, but that term - its exclusivity

 doesn't begin to contain the kind of writer Ebert has blossomed into since post-surgery complications in 2006 rendered him unable to speak. Since then, he's become an indefatigable blogger, producing sprawling think pieces - intimate without the ickiness of the confessional - on everything from Darwinism and the defense of elitism to alcoholism and, somewhat famously, the questionable quality of video games. Film scholar David Bordwell, who writes the foreward to Great Movies III, gets the closest to articulating Ebert's evolution into a cultural commentator: He calls him a "man of letters." Besides having the pleasing ring of the Algonquin Round Table about it (and one suspects Ebert could easily hold his bon-mot own with that crowd), "man of letters" also gets at the expansiveness of Ebert's interests and the nuts-and-bolts precision of his craft. His retelling of Meryl Streep's comic high point in Adaptation, in which she "ingests an obscure Indian

drug, wriggles her toes, and does a phone tone duet," is as delightfully spry as the scene it describes, and he shows Wildean wit with his estimation of Audrey Hepburn in My Fair Lady: "That Hepburn did not do her own singing obscures her triumph, which is that she did her own acting." His has a decep-

tively conversational style - the

kind you might call readable if that word didn't now whiff of dismissiveness. Scrap readable, then; substitute vibrant and vital. **David Thomson**

is another titan in the field, albeit a far more curmudgeonly one. Indeed, one of the great pleasures of The New Biographical Dictionary of

Film is its author's prickliness. (He ruthlessly dispatched Wes Anderson in the 2002 edition thusly: "Watch this space. What does that mean? That he might be something one day.") For this fifth edition (the first one came out in 1975). Thomson has updated the 1,000-plus pre-existing entries and added 130 more. Yes, Anderson

warrants more than 14 cutting words this time around. But the omission of key women in film, especially contemporary artists, continues to rankle. Notably absent: Lisa Cholodenko, Nicole Holofcener, Catherine Breillat, Tamara Jenkins, Barbara Kopple, Deepa Mehta, and Julie Taymor. And though the rightfully lauded editor Walter Murch gets an entry, his contemporaries Dede Allen (Bonnie and Clyde) and Thelma Schoonmaker (Scorcese's longtime collaborator) don't make the cut. Gripes aside - and, truly, Thomson himself is a griper par excellence – The New Biographical Dictionary of Film is indispensable, not to mention legitimately fun for any cineaste. It's a rabbit hole kind of read, wherein a quick skim of, say, Frederic March's filmography will send the reader capering over to check out his Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde director Rouben Mamoulian, who's two entries away from Joseph Mankiewicz, who wrote A Letter to Three Wives, and that might get a person thinking about Max Ophüls' Letter From an Unknown Woman ... until two hours later you find yourself glassy-eyed on Peter Ustinov's page, gorged on film. But what a feast. - Kimberley Jones

Thinking App

Locally developed brain game 'Qrank' gets competitive

Sports and games might push the human animal to its greatest physical and mental feats, but they also tend to bring out the worst interpersonal tendencies of players. Head-butting, board-upending, tantrumthrowing, and vitriolic Twittering are all part and parcel of real, American competition of varying modes. When it comes to quiz games, it's arguably most important to make sure that the person next to you knows who is mentally superior.

What's stopped many electronic quiz games from capitalizing on the Trivial Pursuit crowd is the inability to let others understand just how completely familiar you are with the works of Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, baseball pitchers of the Seventies, or obscure Academy Award winners. These days, thanks to the fine folks at Austin-based Ricochet Labs and their Facebook/iPhone app Qrank (pronounced like the slang word for illegal amphetamines), you can post your score on Facebook for all your friends to see or, for the classier ilk, let the leaderboards speak for themselves.

To understand Qrank and why it's rocketed from an Austinite to an American obsession in mere months, first you'll need to download the free app to your Facebook page or iPhone

(other smart phones will receive Qrank support in the coming months). Choose 15 of the 20 questions separated into such

categories as entertainment, sports, literature, and politics, with material often ripped from the previous day's headlines. Harder questions are worth more points, so, for truly impressive scores, stay away from the easy ones. They're beneath you anyway. Each question has four options, and the sooner you choose the right answer, the more points you get. Finger warmups are recommended. Use the Who Wants To

you along the way. Now, the score is tallied up and placed in the hierarchy of intelligentsia, wherein a sense of self-worth will be either bolstered or dashed. Taking the top spot on the leaderboard is no mean feat, considering there are 200,000 users clawing their way up the ranks. After that there's waiting until the next daily game, where you can defend your crown, redeem yourself, or solidify your residence in Idiotopolis.

"There's something about going head-tohead with someone you admire or respect or hate," says Rodney Gibbs, CEO of Ricochet Labs. "I've had five dozen people say, 'I play every day because I want to beat [Texas Tribune CEO and Editor] Evan Smith." The desire to outsmart local notables and national personalities is something that struck Gibbs at the game's release during South by Southwest 2010. The release party was called "The Astronaut vs. the Monkey" and pitted local gaming legend and rocketman Richard Garriott against Mike Nesmith of the Monkees. Gibbs also called in a favor to old college pal and Alamo Drafthouse founder Tim League to participate.


Qrank's creation owes an even greater debt to the Drafthouse in that the moviehouse's short-lived trivia game Mondo Trivia

> - complete with buttons between seats to input answers - was instructive in terms of what works and what doesn't work. As

in: Event- and location-specific trivia works. Hard-wiring individual seats and trying to get questions from a third party not accustomed to such high demand does not work. Other lessons Gibbs learned: Trivia heads are hardcore. They will attend every night if the questions are fresh. This led directly to the daily updates that set Qrank apart from most other quiz apps, which come preloaded with questions. That means when they run out of questions, you're out of luck. With Qrank, you just cool your heels for 24 hours.

Believe it or not, there are those who don't want to use quiz games solely to humiliate the people they love. Various organizations have contacted Ricochet Labs hoping to use Qrank for their own unique purposes. Test prep companies want it to engage their clients, universities are looking to take rivalries to the next level by pitting whole schools against one another, and even researchers working for the U.S. Department of Education want Ricochet Labs to help make an anti-drug quiz. (The irony of a game called *Qrank* being used to deter drug use is not lost on Gibbs.)

But what if the person next to you is waxing intelligent and you want to put them in their place right then and there? Qrank is the app for that, too. Sync with nearby folks and challenge them to one of the quizzes that start every 15 minutes, 24 hours a day. Find a Qrank spot around town, or just create your own wherever you are and start insulting the brain capacities of strangers to encourage other players to join. And just like that, you've made your very own quiz contest in the break room at work or in line at the DMV.




If strangers and co-workers aren't giving you a challenge, the real trivia-minded come out to places and businesses that host quiz nights using Qrank. Home Slice Pizza has weekly games, and the Texas Tribune hosts a monthly event that draws 80 to 100 people (likely all looking to put the mental smackdown on Evan Smith).

The overlord of Qrank questions is Daily Content Editor Max Pozderac. The brain-burners come from three places: a trivia warehouse for the general questions; Pozderac, who writes the current-event questions; and the suggestions of players. Questions can be submitted online, but please remember, as Pozderac puts it so eloquently, "There's a difference between a trivia question and a trivial question." In other words, keep the Harry Potter minutiae to yourself. Gibbs recalls how Pozderac worked his way from star Qrank player to king of questions: "He was just a player and a trivia nut. He plays trivia all over town. He started submitting questions unsolicited. He said he was looking for an internship, so we said come on in." After a few month on the job, Pozderac got a feel for what players don't like. For one, theme games. People like their trivia general and not all about sharks (as Ricochet Labs did for Shark Week). Turns out that sports earns the title of most contentious category, with people either complaining about its inclusion or bemoaning the absence of a category that gives enthusiasts an edge.

Gibbs is looking into adding channels to the game through partnerships with the media. A sports quiz brought to you by Sports Illustrated? Entertainment Weekly presents an all-movie quiz? Nothing is certain, but the possibilities are there, and Gibbs is exploring them all.

Unlike so many apps that ingratiate themselves onto your phone or Facebook page with the goal of doing nothing more than trying to keep you playing for as long as possible, Qrank requires just a few minutes a day and players (hopefully) finish feeling smarter than when they started. If you don't, prepare to hear the heckling tomorrow.

It's Better To Be Right Than Quick: "Read the question and read the answer choices instead of just picking the one that feels right."

Don't Pick All the Easy Questions: "That's a sucker's bet."

Zeroing in on a ZIP Code

This is the time of year when thoughts of family, friends, and faith come to the forefront. Pop culture teaches us that this season is either full of idyllic wonder or something to morosely trudge through. The truth, I suspect, is somewhere in the middle. Which is why I'd like to nominate **45365** as another of the must-watch films during this holiday season: It hits all the notes about home and family and place just right. The independent film — by first-time directors and brothers **Bill Ross IV** and **Turner Ross** — screens as the next *Independent Lens* feature on PBS.

No, there aren't any sleigh bells ringing or angels visiting the small town of Sidney, Ohio, the Ross brothers' hometown and the centerpiece of their film (the title of which is Sidney's ZIP code). Most of all, there is no droll voiceover or pushy score to remind us how we're supposed to feel. All we receive are images and ambient sound. People do speak – with amazing candor, it seems – which is a testament to the insider access the filmmakers had with the people and places of their hometown. But it's what's said in the silences that makes the film so incredibly fascinating, funny, magical, and ultimately moving.

Filmed over nine months, the Ross brothers take their camera all over Sidney, capturing

what some might call the unseemly (there's a straight-out-of-*Cops* moment in which a barechested man is arrested), alongside the congenial (as when a gathering of elderly women at a nursing home discusses their needs and likes in men – and I don't think they're talking about having someone around to open a stubborn jar or kill a spider). All the subjects are treated with evenhanded respect and dignity.

There are many familiar and endearing imag-

es for anyone who grew up in the Midwest;


the film takes flight when the camera settles its gaze on the otherwise ordinary and reveals another layer, and then another. I suspect these moments occur for viewers at various places, but I know that my first moment came when watching children flying through the air on a carnival ride at night. Magical! Another moment was listening to the bare-chested man in the back of the squad car, speaking to the cop who'd just arrested him. I can't even tell you why it's touching - it's something like when a distant relative or stranger is able to reveal his truths to you but is unable to articulate the same to his intimates. That the Ross brothers captured these moments is nothing short of remarkable.

45365 won the 2009 Documentary Feature Grand Jury Award at the South by Southwest Film Festival as well as the Chaz and Roger Ebert Truer Than Fiction Award at the 2010 Independent Spirit Awards. "[T]his achingly beautiful film ... evokes what Winesburg, Ohio might have looked like as a documentary," Roger Ebert of the Chicago Sun-Times wrote. I couldn't have said it better myself.

45365 airs Tuesday, Dec. 14, at 9pm on PBS. Later this month, PBS broadcasts *The Calling*. I've only seen the first part of this two-part event, and I can't wait for more. Unlike the well-meaning but turgid *God in*

America (which you can watch online at www.pbs.org), The Calling follows seven contemporary Catholic, Protestant, Jewish, and Muslim Americans who have heard the call of their faith and are determining the best way to follow their individual paths.

"The United States is one of the most religiously observant and spiritually diverse countries in the world," the film's press materials point out, "yet mainstream media has surprisingly underrepresented the significance of faith in the U.S. Pluralism has been explored almost exclusively in terms of race and culture, while explorations of faith

often focus on scandals or extremism." Very true, which is why this nuanced, intimate, and sincere film is so enormously engaging.





Not Fade Away

"As much as it's really, truly an honor to be considered for a **Grammy**," says **Will Sheff**, the day after being nominated for Best Album Notes for Roky Erickson with Okkervil River's True Love Cast Out All Evil, "it feels misplaced. The record is a tribute to Roky, his incredible songs, and his incredible performances. It should be all about him." Even so, it was Sheff's scholarly apprenticeship and patient, respectful guidance that made the **Rokkervil** collaboration such a rousing success (see "Please Judge," April 16). All told, 43 Texas-born or -based acts received a total of 54 Grammy nominations, a generous sum that includes nods to Miranda Lambert (five), the Arcade Fire (three), and Beyoncé (two). The usual suspects will also be accounted for at the 53rd annual award ceremony in February: Willie Nelson (Best Americana Album, Country Music), Jimmie Vaughan (Best Traditional Blues Album, Plays Blues, Ballads & Favorites), former Lifetime Achievement Award recipient Pinetop Perkins (Best Traditional Blues Album, the Willie "Big Eyes" Smith-assisted Joined at the Hip), and Patty Griffin, who has two chances to win - Best Traditional Gospel Album for Downtown Church and Best Americana Album, as a part of Robert Plant's Band of Joy. On a more DIY front, local studio wizard Erik Wofford bolsters his résumé as mastering engi-



neer for Grupo Fantasma's El Existential, which is up for Best Latin Rock, Alternative or Urban Album, while Sara Hickman contributed two selections to Healthy Food for Thought: Good Enough To Eat (Best Spoken Word Album for Children), and the Black Angels were featured on The Twilight Saga: Eclipse, nominated for Best Compilation Soundtrack. Aside from cross-cultural Tejano act Tortilla Factory, perhaps the most surprising nod went to Wolfgang Gartner, a local DJ who's worked with the Black Eyed Peas, Britney Spears, and Deadmau5. He's up for Best Remixed Recording, Non-Classical, via his treatment of Andy Caldwell's "Funk Nasty," a house single from a few years back that was edited and re-released for Grammy eligibility. "That's a really good example of my old electro-style," says Gartner, born Joey Youngman, "but I've moved on from that sound." www.grammy.com.

Electric Ladyland

Double Trouble bruiser Chris
Layton joined Jonny Lang and Band
of Gypsys' Billy Cox on The Tonight
Show With Jay Leno on Monday for an
all-star version of Jimi Hendrix's
"Fire." The event served as a capstone
to the recent Experience Hendrix
tour, for which Austin's Eric Johnson
had the rare honor of playing the white
Stratocaster the iconic guitarist used
for his decade-defining Woodstock
set. "It was a really nice guitar, but it
was more about the mystique of playing
it," relays Johnson, whose nightly five-

song set included a duet with **Susan Tedeschi** on *Axis: Bold as Love*'s "One Rainy Wish." "You could see and feel all of the pick scratches on the underside because Jimi played left-handed." The local guitar hero just released his first new studio album in five years, *Up Close*, a more personal collection of space-age Texas blues and progressive clairvoyance, a small step removed from his infamous studio perfectionism. "I'm trying to strike a new balance, to use the part of the music that serves me and let go of the rest," he

says. "There's a bit more spontaneity to the recording. Tracks are being performed rather than pieced together."

Just in time for the holidays, Johnson also recently released *Live From Austin TX '84*, his first **Austin City Limits** appearance, recorded shortly before the sessions for his 1986 breakthrough, *Tones*. He's already started working on an acoustic album in preparation for a solo tour next year. "It's just a different side of me that's really started to emerge more from me in recent years."



At the Drive-In

The **East Side Drive-In** resembled a private planetarium Friday for the **Octopus Project**'s *Hexadecagon*, a bigtent visual spectacle and pan-stereo experience. The local visionaries performed in the round, surrounded by an eight-channel speaker system, with **Yvonne Lambert**'s theremin serving as the calming eye of the electronic whirlpool. Though the quartet never lost its gleeful, we-can-pull-this-off charm, the event yielded more icing than cake, with the long, minimalist pieces never quite reaching their full potential, especially in contrast to the urgency displayed in the encore of *Hello*, *Avalanche*'s "Truck" and "I Saw the Bright Shinies." The following, unseasonably warm night, **DJ Cutmaster Swiff** pinpoint-



ed the Achilles' heel of the new fenced-in, bilevel venue. "We on some curfew shit," he noted around 9:30pm, a half-hour into **Big Boi**'s set. "We only got 12 minutes." Thankfully, the **OutKast** originator had already proven just how many greatest hits he could walk through in that time frame, opening with a ghetto blaster medley of "ATLiens," "Skew It on the Bar-B," and "Rosa Parks." From the up-in-smoke chimney sweep of "Fo Yo Sorrows" to the militant charge of "B.O.B." and artillery-clip a cappella on "Daddy Fat Sax," "General Patton" proved he's still one of the coolest motherfunkers on the planet.

On the Road Again

Inspired by **John Steinbeck**'s 1960 book, *Travels With Charley: In Search of America*, **Charlie Faye** trekked across the Great Divide and back again to make her third album. Beginning last New Year's Eve, the Austin songstress spent one month in 10 different cities, working with local musicians and recording a new song in each location. "There were definitely setbacks and some hard times, but somehow it pulled itself up and out of it every time," says Faye, a **Wilson Street** resident and community activist (see "Suspended in Time," News, Aug. 13). "A lot of this stuff wasn't organized beforehand, but when you go somewhere



and actually meet people and let things be, a lot can happen in a month." In creating the soundtrack to her road trip, Faye ended up collaborating with lan Moore (Portland, Ore.), members of Calexico (Tuscon, Ariz.), the Eagles (Los Angeles), and Violent Femmes (Milwaukee). She finally returns home to **Momo's** on Wednesday, Dec. 15, and has started a Kickstarter campaign (www.kck.st/ cB5EH2) to help com-

plete the album, offering incentives that range from digital downloads and tour consulting to house concerts. "I don't think there's any place better to live than Austin," Faye observes, "unless you have really bad allergies or a tendency towards alcoholism."

Random Play

Local punk progenitor **Tim Kerr** has re-pressed *Your* Name Here, his collection of tempura portraits and social commentary, with local multimedia experts **Monofonus Press**. The new edition boasts a cassette mixtape of Kerr's greatest hits, including cuts from the **Big Boys**, **Poison 13**, **Lord High Fixers**, and the **Monkeywrench**. Browse it at the **Indie Lit Roadshow** at **ND at 501 Studios** on Sunday, Dec. 12, noon-9pm.

Nick Curran & the Lowlifes, Alejandro Escovedo, and the Mother Truckers have tunes under consideration for Little Steven's Underground Garage competition to champion the Coolest Song in the World 2010. Vote at www.littlestevensundergroundgarage.com/csw.

Friday, Dec. 10, at **Yard Dog Gallery**, **Ian McLagan** opens his first exhibit, "Paint From Pain," a collection of paintings that attempts to capture the numb frustration of migraines. "I find it quite challenging," offers McLagan, who appears next at the **SIMS Benefit Bash** at the **Austin Music Hall** on Saturday. He hasn't given up on his quest to bring the **Faces** to Austin. "As long as we have **Ronnie [Wood]** we're all right. **Keith [Richards]** should write another book, keep them off the road."

Once dubbed "The Pied Piper of the Keys," **Ernie Mae Crafton Miller** passed away in local hospice care Wednesday morning. She was 83. A pianist who got her start in the 1940s with the **Prairie View Co-eds**, Miller was a fixture of East Austin's Chitlin Circuit and held a 16-year residency at Red River's infamous **New Orleans Club** (see "The Miller's Tale," July 6, 2007). Services are pending.

Alphabet City

A 'Chronicle of Philanthropy'

If you're a musician playing on Sixth Street and are stopped on MLK by APD for a DWI on your way home, you may seek help from AA. But if you're a musician with hep C, MS, or even TMJ, do you go to HAAM? What if you're U-18 and a best friend who just out of rehab is hanging with her old dealer — can you call SIMS or PDAP? And why is the late Clifford Antone's name associated with AYW?

It's not just music-centric health and social services that are known by acronyms and initials. If you aspire to play SXSW, ACL, or FFF, maybe a seminar from AMF or a course at ACC will help. Even then, the letter game in Austin's community conscience is unique even among other rare, self-sustaining music scenes. And don't worry if it feels like we live in Alphabet City; navigating ATX can be easy as one-two-three.

Safety Nets and Peace of Mind

Few nonindustry organizations are more synonymous with Austin music than the Health Alliance for Austin Musicians and the Services Invested in Musician Support Foundation; they're the conjoined twins of Austin music outreach. They tackle the double whammy of keeping the local community in shape physically and mentally.

HAAM, founded in 2005, offers low-cost primary health care services, basic dental coverage, and mental health counseling to eligible uninsured musicians in the area. The SIMS Foundation, established a decade earlier, provides access to and financial support for mental health care and addiction recovery services for musicians and their families in and around Austin. Neither organization provides direct assistance, but both work with such service providers as the Seton Family of Hospitals and Alcoholics Anonymous.

Austin boasts a particularly large demographic of musicians – around 8,000 working, according to HAAM figures. Those numbers span many generations, each with health issues specific to its age group. SIMS serves more than 600 clients annually, while HAAM has already aided more than 25% of Austin's musician population.

SIMS Foundation Executive Director Tricia Forbes believes the presence of both organizations makes a difference. "Financial insecurity, proximity to drugs and alcohol, hectic travel schedules" and other well-known dynamics contribute to the chaotic demands

of a musician's lifestyle and unintentionally create clients.

"There's a national trend toward holistic, integrated health care services, and HAAM and SIMS are working together in that vein," explains Forbes. "We know that our clients' mental health outcomes are going to be better if they also have primary health care, as well as the other important health services they can receive through HAAM. Having these safety nets seems to give musicians some peace of mind."

HAAM Executive Director Carolyn Schwarz would be happier if SIMS had been inspired by any other reason than the suicide of Sims Ellison (see "Swaggering, Strutting Texas Hunks," p.53) but is grateful it was already in place when the alliance started up.

"The mental health and addiction-recovery services offered through the SIMS Foundation are vital to the continuum," she stresses. "Healthy musicians mean a healthier Austin economy and culture. Since the inception of Health Alliance for Austin Musicians five years ago, musicians have access to a full range of healthcare services."

Not only are both organizations successful, Austin remains a health care model for other cities to emulate, much as HAAM's guiding light, late philanthropist Robin Shivers (see "Steel Bluebonnet Determination," Nov. 27, 2009), used New Orleans' musicians' medical program as one of her inspirations.

The downside is that demand is high and need grows, and both require filthy lucre.

Fund Fund Fund Fest

Before his death in May 2006, Clifford Antone chose American YouthWorks as his cause. American YouthWorks is a public charter school with a GED program and on-the-job training, particularly encouraging its at-risk students – some of whom are teen parents – toward green jobs. That's a lot of fancy talk for a hardscrabble program Susan Antone calls "the last house on the last street for some of these kids."

On paper, AYW boasts an impressive roll call of partners, including the U.S. Department of Education, Whole Foods, and PepsiCo, and yet its East Ben White Boulevard headquarters is in need of basics such as copier paper and hand sanitizer. To assist them, Clifford Antone created Austin's annual big-dollar music fundraiser, Help Clifford Help Kids, a Champagne

and dinner-with-auction affair of the type more often associated with the Austin Film Society's Texas Film Hall of Fame or AIDS Services of Austin's OctoTea Dance. Since her brother's death, Susan Antone has continued the Help Clifford fundraisers, upping the ante by bringing in prestigious acts such as Booker T. & the MGs.

Help Clifford Help Kids held its 2010 AYW fundraiser last month to the beat of Los Lonely Boys at the AT&T Executive Education & Conference Center. The fifth annual HAAM Benefit Day exploded in September with 120 acts performing at dozens of sites around town. SIMS rolls out its red carpet of all-stars Saturday, Dec. 11 (see "Swaggering, Strutting Texas Hunks," p.53) at the Austin Music Hall. All of them need your generosity, especially since charity functions have felt the bite in these tough economic times. Fund Fund Fund Fest begins at home.

And make no mistake, the collection of funds to support charitable organizations is big business in itself, big enough to warrant the *Chronicle of Philanthropy*, a national publication that tracks the nonprofit world. A recent *CP* survey indicated that in 2009, contributions were down by 11%, the worst drop in two decades. That figure was culled from organizations that raise the most from private sources, meaning that local and regional groups such as SIMS and HAAM will have to reach even further.

The Future's So Bright, I Gotta Wear HAAM Prescription Shades

"This year's HAAM Benefit Day was recordbreaking in the number of businesses participating, the number of music performances, and the funds raised (\$195,000). This has allowed HAAM to expand the number of affiliate service providers to five."

Carolyn Schwarz's assessment of HAAM's current good health is a reminder that the organization doesn't operate health care services; rather, it conducts eligibility, enrollment, and care management at its office and then contracts for services.

"For example, in 2011, HAAM is contracting with SIMS and will provide funding specifically for addiction recovery services," continues Schwarz. "HAAM also has contracts with Seton Family of Hospitals for primary medical care, Estes Audiology for hearing, and Prevent Blindness Texas for vision care. In addition, HAAM has an agreement with St. David's Foundation Dental Program to provide basic dental care to musicians enrolled in HAAM."

The SIMS Foundation's glowing numbers translate just as dramatically, and not just in the much-needed areas of funding and staffing. Tricia Forbes points out that every step forward opens more doors to more clients. "We know there are still underserved commu-

Swaggering, Strutting Texas Hunks

"Five young swaggering, strutting Texas hunks playing the shit out of rock & roll."

That's how David Garza remembers the band Pariah, a pungent description echoed by those who remember their glory days as Austin's premier hard rock band. The SIMS Benefit Bash this Saturday, Dec. 11, at the Austin Music Hall will pay tribute to the late-1980s/early-1990s quintet. E-mailing from a truckstop while on the road in Louisiana, Garza, who is the benefit's musical director, reveled in his own memories.

"Pariah laid down the framework for post hair-band metal in Austin. There would be no the Sword or Red River gutter punk without Pariah. They had it all: native son/golden god screecher frontman, two-headed dog/Siamese twin evil guitars, thunder heart drum and bass.

"Dave Derrick had no cheeky wink-wink smugness. He was soul on the sleeve and balls to the wall. Jared [Tuten] and Kyle [Ellison] were cosmic metal weavers with the charisma and ease of a mid-1970s Keith and Ronnie. Shandon [Sahm] was pure power: unshakable and funky before the mechanization of rock in the mid-1990s, a human amphetamine.

"And Sims was that sweetheart and dharma energy, like Montgomery Clift crossed with Ronnie Lane. Pariah could have only happened once."

Sims, of course, is Sims Ellison, namesake of the SIMS Foundation, a beloved guitarist who lost his lifelong battle with depression and committed suicide in 1995. After writer Michael Corcoran suggested that Ellison's memory could be honored by helping others, the organization took shape and shifted many times over the years before settling. Thanks to



Jody Denberg, KGSR began donating the proceeds from its annual Broadcasts CD series to the SIMS Foundation. By paying tribute to Pariah, the lineup for this weekend's SIMS Benefit Bash is as much about the foundation's namesake as it is about supporting the organization.

Garza joked that between Brownout and Eliza Gilkyson, "the lineup needs therapy – it has a split personality!" He's not kidding. Performers also include maestro Peter Bay, lan McLagan & the Bump Band, Brannen Temple, Amy Cook, Graham Reynolds, Will Sexton, Don Harvey, George Reiff, Kat Edmondson, Ruby Jane, Lauren Larson, and the SIMS Septet with David Garza, in addition to a Pariah tribute.

For more than a dozen years, the KGSR check presentation to the SIMS Foundation has been an integral part of the Austin Music Awards. More personally, Sims Ellison was a friend of mine and even wrote for the Chronicle, so when SIMS approached me about sharing emcee duties with Denberg for this show, I couldn't refuse.

Demand is high and need grows, and both require filthy lucre.

nities, particularly African-American, Latino, and women musicians. We started an intensive outreach effort this year, but we hope to have more resources to build on it and really see some results next year.

"Instead of just counting the 600-plus people we serve each year, we are now tracking our clients' outcomes and we know that their lives and mental health are improved significantly because of our services," Forbes enthuses. "A stronger partnership with HAAM, the contract with Central Health, increased funding from St. David's, and an expanding circle of individuals and corporations have made it all possible."

While SIMS has long operated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, HAAM was a special project fund of the Austin Community Foundation. Until recently, that is, notes Schwarz.

"We are now our own 501(c)(3) and as of January 1, 2011, we will roll out from under ACF and will be doing all our own bookkeeping. HAAM is growing up!"

On behalf of the musicians of ATX, that's A-OK.

LIFE

by Keith Richards, with James Fox Little, Brown and Company, 564 pp., \$29.99

Born Dec. 18, 1943, Keith Richards remains your classic high-end Sagittarius. Over the course of 13 chapters that time will ultimately prove the Dead Sea Scrolls of rock & roll, astrology may be the only germane topic the Rolling Stones' heart and soul fails to address. That and all of 1974 – birth year of It's Only Rock 'n' Roll. Bob Dylan's Chronicles achieved literature; never forget whose name young Robert Zimmerman copped. Keith Richards' Life pulls off a feat equal to his song "Gimme Shelter" ("It was just a terrible fucking day and it was storming out there"). The guitarist is quite exacting about the group's material through Goats Head Soup: "I would say on a general scale, I would come up with the song and the basic idea, and Mick would do all the hard work of filling it in and making it interesting. I would come up with, 'I can't get no satisfaction I can't get no satisfaction I tried



and I tried and I tried." That Mick Jagger at his very finest has never been recognized as a lyricist on par with Dylan is something the singer can take up in his own memoirs. This Life comes by an only child who survived the World War II blitz and early runthood with an attitude ("Get Off of My Cloud"), romanticism ("Ruby Tuesday"), and snarling selfpreservation ("Street Fighting Man," "Midnight Rambler," "Rip This Joint"), though always imbued with genuine vulnerability ("Angie"). Richards wrote and sang "Happy" for God's sake. That voice herein parallels the life force punch-lined in an episode about discovering a dead tramp in a machine gun post "pillbox" as a boy: "We ran like the fucking Nile." The Fender bender tosses off lines like that as easy as open-E-tuned throttlers ("We never forget a good hook"), but the true grit lies in defining moments such as his mother Doris literally bringing him to his knees by telling him "the Man" was coming to take him away for throwing rotten tomatoes ("No, Mum, please ..."). Insert lump in throat. Richards' innate truth-saying hammers out all the myths and barbarism, from deals with the devil (naturally) to Swiss blood transfusions (sorry), but this Life beats a uniquely epic, one-of-a-kind, whale of a tale, not some music history corrective. Yin and yang rule the Glimmer Twins' house of love and warfare ("Surprise, Surprise" to quote one of Richards' early song gems), but the principle of "give the drummer some" begins at Charlie Watts. The author's bond with John Lennon and brotherhood in Bobby Keys (born within hours of his boss) runs deeper than drug buddies, but then as he concedes, it ain't called "heroin(e)" for kicks. The sordid arc of Richards' decadelong enslavement to the embalming opiate ranges from James Bond-like escapes in the south of France to his lawyer using White House connections to spring Richards from his infamous '77 heroin bust in Toronto. Moroccan abduction/abandonment, Russian roulette fatality, Jamaican angels and thieves, Fiji brain hemorrhaging - no musician of this global stature has ever penned such a Life. Sagittarians can't be governed, but Richards is their sovereign, his bohemian, nonconformism bent with a brilliant, almost engineer-type mind, steel jacketed in a shy, sensitive personality nevertheless inclined to lead from behind the sign's metaphoric quiver of arrows. Milton, Beethoven, William Blake, Mark Twain, Gen. George Custer, Joseph Conrad, Toulouse-Lautrec, Winston Churchill, Boris Karloff, Franco, Harpo Marx, Ira Gershwin, Lucky Luciano, Walt Disney, Maria Callas, Bruce Lee, Jimi Hendrix, Pablo Escobar, Nick Barbaro (also born Dec. 18) – know the type, understand Life. If it were an album you'd play it ad infinitum. - Raoul Hernandez

THE BIG PAYBACK: THE HISTORY OF THE BUSINESS OF HIP-HOP

by Dan Charnas New American Library, 660 pp., \$24.95

For most hip-hop books, a discussion of the founding fathers would address the contributions of Kool Herc, Afrika Bambaataa, and Grandmaster Flash. The Big Payback: The History of the Business of Hip-Hop is not most

hip-hop books. The opening pages begin with Thomas Jefferson, Alexander Hamilton, and George Washington, while connecting the origins of American currency to the Sugarhill



Gang. It's all about the Benjamins, baby. In his exhaustive study of how hip-hop went from Bronx block party to global phenomenon, former Source magazine writer Dan Charnas takes the long view of history, but it's the details and insider anecdotes that give the more than 600 pages the intrigue of a Slick Rick tale. The riveting dialogue culled from more than 300 interviews makes it seem as if Charnas was in the room for every deal that ever went down in hip-hop.

and sometimes he was. The Big Payback naturally chronicles the stories of self-made moguls like Russell Simmons, Master P, and Jay-Z ("the soul of a poet and instincts of


a killer"), but also the stories of countless behind-the-scenes shakers (Wendy Day, Chris Lighty) who are anything but household names. Charnas explores Ice-T's "Cop Killer" controversy in astonishing depth and levies a stinging indictment against the record labels, radio stations, and magazines that profited from fueling a trumped-up East-West rivalry in the mid-1990s, but *Payback* is ultimately a classic American success story: "This isn't crossover anymore. It is takeover. America has officially been remixed."

AFRICAN RHYTHMS: THE AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF RANDY WESTON

by Randy Weston, arranged by Willard Jenkins Duke University Press, 352 pp., \$32.95

No one has done more to explore and celebrate the African roots of jazz than pianist/composer Randy Weston. Considering himself "an African born and living in



America," Weston demonstrates a pride in his ancestry and culture that is both the primary source of his artistic inspiration and the central theme that suffuses this fascinating autobiography. Now 84 and riding the success of a new live album, *The Storyteller* (Motéma Music), Weston's career has been both typical and extraordinary. Raised on the streets of Brooklyn's renowned Bed-Stuy neighborhood by a father of Jamaican descent, his music first blossomed

while working resorts in the Berkshire Mountains. He parlayed an early interest in African culture into touring the continent under the aegis of the U.S. State Department. While many of his peers expatriated to Europe in the 1960s, Weston moved to Morocco, opening a popular jazz club and developing deep musical, cultural, and emotional ties, especially to the people of Gnawa. For decades his recording projects, many examined here, have exuded an unabashedly Afrocentric sensibility. Weston refers to himself as "a storyteller through music" rather than a jazz musician. He's unsurpassed as a goodwill ambassador. Jay Trachtenberg

SOUL MINING: A MUSICAL LIFE by Daniel Lanois Faber and Faber Inc., 217 pp., \$26 (paper)

Soul Mining closes with a transcript from the poetic allegory of dedication and discovery Daniel Lanois first presented as the keynote



speaker for South by Southwest 2003. and the book is essentially an extended exposition of his talk. Less a personal biography than a memoir of work, Lanois' reflections on helping create some of the past quarter-century's most enduring albums (U2 to Dylan, Willie to Emmylou) is hardly anecdotal; it's behind the scenes only in the sense of the tireless hours dedicated to the pursuit of an intangible sound that the producer is nonetheless driven to make real. Lanois writes with a calm, contemplative passion that jumps with energy at the spark of insight, and to read his meandering recollections is to join Lanois in his state of "sick, up all night, fighting for a track" dedication and persistence. Soul Mining is inspirational in tone, aspirational in philosophy, and a gearhead's gospel – a must-read for any producer or studio aficionado. The book's ultimate achievement is sending readers back to classic albums spun a thousand times before to hear them anew, now wrought through the ears and vision of the musical and technical genius of Lanois. A VERY IRREGULAR HEAD: THE LIFE OF SYD BARRETT

by Rob Chapman Da Capo Press, 480 pp., \$28

Not long after unveiling the template for British psychedelia with 1967's *The Piper at the Gates of Dawn*, Pink Floyd co-founder Syd Barrett began a steady descent into madness and reclusion, leaving



behind a sea of rumors and speculation that continued until his 2006 death from pancreatic cancer.

London-based journalist Rob
Chapman's family-authorized biography sets the record as straight as it's likely to get. In distilling the essence of what Barrett brought to Pink Floyd prior to his 1968 ouster, Chapman zeroes in on the influence of author Kenneth Grahame, whose surreal tales and

whimsical wordplay were key to songs like "Arnold Layne" and "Bike." The primacy of visual art in Barrett's life - both before and after his reluctant bout with pop stardom - is another theme. He held particular fascination for Port Arthur, Texas-born artist Robert Rauschenberg's assemblage techniques. As a backdrop to Floyd's ascendancy, Chapman provides a vivid description of the multimodal cultural explosion that grew out of the London Free School during the mid-1960s. He also details the day-today drop-off in Barrett's mental state that led to a complete abandonment of music by 1972. At times, Chapman's prose gets mired in exhaustive overcontextualization, but maybe that's the trade-off when you're dealing with fleeting and/or chemically impaired recollections. - Greg Beets

TALKING TO GIRLS ABOUT DURAN DURAN by Rob Sheffield Dutton, 274 pp., \$25.95

As a follow-up to his heartbreaking memoir Love Is a Mix Tape, pop culture sponge and Rolling Stone critic Rob Sheffield's latest speaks to a genera-




tional love rather than personal. There's a nostalgic whiplash in his introduction, where he posits that he learned about girls listening to us talk about Duran Duran. He doesn't talk to the girl for long before reverting back to music, making the band a placeholder rather than bearers of ancient female truths. He puts on his headphones, attaching 1980s hits ("Purple Rain") and misses (A Flock of Seagulls) to his awkward, sweet stories. Sometimes he hits, like when comparing the ritual of religious upbringing and music obsession: "It's no coincidence so many record geeks grow up Catholic - it really prepares you for that path. Praying the rosary was 20 minutes just like an album side." Elsewhere. the obscure bands he chooses to dote on (Haysi Fantayzee?) reminds readers that this is one man's very specific experience, born of a generation's broader alienated "me"ness. As a female who prepubescently fantasized about Simon Le Bon in the "Hungry Like a Wolf" video, I wasn't expecting shared experience, but definitely some juicier gossip.

CORN FLAKES WITH JOHN LENNON AND OTHER TALES FROM A ROCK 'N' **ROLL LIFE**

Most people discussing the death of rock criticism are the writers themselves. often logrolling as one another's biggest fans. Editor Ann Powers' thoughtful eye on contemporary rock writers avoids that fancy stepping, and many of the



chapters are notably good. Sean Nelson's rambling treatise on sex and 1990s rock & roll "Let's (Not) Get It On" is quite layered with interesting tangents and his still-youthful remembrances. Best Music Writing is clearly not about critique - interviews often escape the ability of a writer to dissect the conversation; Eugene Holley Jr.'s otherwise informative Q&A with Maria Schneider comes off dry and all quote, whereas Raquel Cepeda's visit to a classroom to discuss Rihanna v. Chris

Brown dazzles in its many facets. Contrast the many voices with Robert Hilburn's alone. The venerable Los Angeles Times music critic is old-school in every sense of the words. His words in Corn Flakes With John Lennon are velvet strokes to the velour nap of Best Music Writing's youth. It's not just that Hilburn has been there and gotten the tour T-shirt for any band he wanted. Hilburn is the real thing writing about the real thing. His chapter on Ice Cube, N.W.A, and growing up in the South beats all the essays in Best Music Writing. eloquent and curious and evenhanded. Corn Flakes is written memoir-style with sidebar chapters featuring bulleted highlights of favorite concerts, quotes, and opinions he doesn't flinch from stating. Hilburn's a pro, and they don't make 'em like that much any more.

TOUCHABLE SOUND: A COLLECTION OF 7-INCH **RECORDS FROM THE USA**

edited by Brian Roettinger, Mike Treff, Diego Hadis Soundscreen Design, 412 pp., \$40 (paper)

This tactile, reverent collection is a Bible of punk rock's oft-forgotten layer. Part graphic design boner, part historic punk trail of tears, the 400-page map is divided by region, starting in Southern California and ending in the Northeast. Label origin stories and first-person testimonials are interspersed throughout well-designed pages of 7-inch covers from the last two decades. The way the various components are put together is piecemeal, but that's no doubt supposed to fuel its zine feel, which has never fallen out of vogue. Ultimately, the focus is on the visual appeal of the 7-inch, from known quantities like Melvins to obscurities like Marshmallow Coast, which proves the ritual of the music obsessive is alive and well and makes this collection a topshelf find. That's essentially what this is - a hagiography with the Xeroxed and stapled feel of scenes these vinyl slabs emerged from.




Vince Neil's already dished The Dirt. That gloriously filthy and often contradictory account of Mötley Crüe's seedy reign on Sunset Strip remains one of rock history's definitive memoirs. On the occasion of his new solo album of the same name, Dr. Feelgood drags a few more skeletons from the closet, most notably an in-depth account of his 1984 vehicular manslaughter of Hanoi Rocks drummer Razzle. Compiled from a series of interviews by noted beat-journalist Mike Sager, Tattoos & Tequila presents a near 300-page-long one-way conversation, broken up with occasional asides from outside commentators, such as Neil's four wives. While more entertaining than his C-list celebrity appearance on ABC's Skating With the Stars, this biography offers mere sloppy seconds, especially in comparison to Nikki Sixx's riveting Heroin Diaries. Likewise, Steven Adler's a reality wash-up (Celebrity Rehab) from the same scene and with a new project to peddle, Adler's Appetite. His Appetite for Destruction, however, plays out as a tragicomedy. After all, it takes a serious fuckup to botch a suicide attempt, and the onetime Guns N' Roses drummer failed three times. If his perpetual fall from grace comes across like a high school dropout lighting up and bragging about getting laid, you've gotten the gist of the story. There are some funny moments (his orgy with Sixx for starters), and it's a quick, light read, made even faster by the self-explanatory section headers. My favorite six-page run: "Getting My Drums," "New Drums," "The Biggest Practice Facility on Earth," "Oh Well," "The Birth of 'Slash,'" and "Working on the Drums." - Austin Powell

FAB: AN INTIMATE LIFE OF PAUL **MCCARTNEY**

by Howard Sounes Da Capo Press, 640 pp., \$29.95

In a strictly biographical sense, Paul McCartney's good fortune of living beyond "When I'm Sixty-Four" can't compete with



a narrative that ends as tragically as John Lennon's. Even so, British journalist Howard Sounes' epic McCartney biography is essential. Beginning with the future Sir Paul's "commonsense" working-class Liverpool upbringing, Sounes charts McCartney's rise to fame through relationships with Dot Rhone - whose miscarriage preempted marriage - and actress/fiancée Jane Asher. Sounes credits Asher and her upper-middle-class London family for providing McCartney with "the education he might have had at college, if he had turned his back on pop music." Likewise, McCartney's decision to follow the counsel of wife Linda's attorney father Lee Eastman proved financially prescient. Musically speaking, Sounes makes a compelling argument that competition from Lennon was a prerequisite for the full flowering of McCartney's songwriting genius. Forensic evidence includes some of the laziest toss-offs from Macca's solo catalog, including 2001's post-9/11 atrocity, "Freedom." McCartnev isn't immune to male-pattern boorishness, yet even the ugliest revelations from his illadvised second marriage to Heather Mills seem positively quaint by tabloid standards. Sounes is no hagiographer, but in the end, his vivid rendering of McCartney reveals a fundamentally decent chap on balance. - Greg Beets





The collapse of the economy in 2008 might have reached the far corners of Earth, but evidently not to Planet Calypso, the make-believe asteroid containing make-believe real estate in the multiplayer online game *Entropia Universe*, where resort entrepreneur Jon Jacobs recently cashed out his properties for \$635,000 - in real (not make-believe) U.S. dollars. Since Jacobs' original 2005 investment was \$100,000 (a record at that time), he thus has earned an average 35% annual return. As players landed on Jacobs' properties, to hunt or to mine precious substances, they paid fees, and Jacobs' buyers are obviously optimistic they can maintain that income stream. A recent study by marketing firm In-Stat estimated that online players will spend \$7 billion in 2010 on make-believe property and goods.

GOVERNMENT IN ACTION

In September, the UK's coalition government announced the imminent consolidation of anti-discrimination laws known as the Equality Act – despite critics' warnings that it could stunt economic growth by tying up the workplace in a morass of lawsuits in which workers could sue for almost any perceived offense. Under the new concept of "third-party harassment," for example, an employee who merely overhears another person - even a customer of his employer say something he finds offensive could sue the employer. Critics also complained that the law adds to the traditional group of specially protected, oppressed people the minorities of vegans, teetotalers, Gypsies, and "travelers" (grifters).

In October, Freddie Mac (the governmentsponsored but privately owned home mortgage financier - whose massive debts have been assumed in a federal "bailout" administered by the Treasury Department) filed a claim in Tax Court against the Internal Revenue Service, denying IRS' claim that it owes \$3 billion in back taxes from 1998 to 2005. Should taxpayers care? If Freddie Mac wins, the IRS (which is also housed in the Treasury Department) loses out on the \$3 billion in alleged back taxes. If the IRS wins, it gets its \$3 billion, which will undoubtedly be paid with taxpayer bailout money. Lawyers for both sides seem to think that pursuing the lawsuit is important.

In November, patrons using restrooms at City Hall in Chandler, Ariz., were stunned to see wall signs warning users not to drink out of the urinals and toilets. (Actually, as officials explained, the environmentally friendly facilities flush with "reused" water – from the building's cooling system – which must normally be colorized to discourage inadvertent drinking, and if it is not so harshly colored, must, by regulation, be accompanied by warning signs.)

After Hurricane Katrina devastated New Orleans and the Gulf Coast in 2005, Congress underwrote \$7.9 billion in taxfree bonds that Louisiana could sell in

order to rehabilitate the area. According to an August status report in *Newsweek*, \$5.9 billion in bonds have been sold by the state, but only \$55 million of that (1%) is for projects inside New Orleans (and none in the devastated Lower Ninth Ward). By contrast, \$1.7 billion (about 29%) is going to projects that benefit the state's oil industry.

GREAT ART!


One of midtown Manhattan's favorite meet-up spots, according to an October report in *The New York Times*, is Colombian artist Fernando Botero's 12-foot-tall Adam statue at Time Warner Center. However, since Adam is nude and the statue is so pedestrian-friendly, maintaining it has become a problem, according to the center's general manager. As the *Times* described it, "Most of Adam is a deep dark brown," but the easily-accessible penis "is worn golden from extensive handling." (The *Times* also noted that "at the Botero" is a less-popular meet-up suggestion than underneath the penis.)

Artist Noam Braslavsky's life-size sculpture honoring the great Israeli army general and Prime Minister Ariel Sharon went on display in Tel Aviv in October. However, Braslavsky chose to depict Sharon (who he said is "kind of an open nerve in Israeli society") not in battle nor as an international statesman – but in his hospital bed, where he has been confined in a medically induced coma since suffering a massive stroke in January 2006.

POLICE REPORT

Sheriff's deputies in Manatee County, Fla., arrested two men in October after a traffic stop when, following a thorough search of the car's trunk, they found marijuana. In fact, the search of the messy trunk was so thorough that they also turned up a bong, which driver Mark Fiasco said he had lost seven years before and has been looking for since.





Responding to a domestic-dispute call at the I-77 Motor Inn in Fairplain, W.Va., in October, sheriff's deputies encountered Melissa Williams naked from the waist down and holding a knife. Two men in the room (one, her estranged husband) said Williams had threatened them. "[S] omebody," she reportedly said, "is going to eat my [vulgar anatomical reference], or I'm going to cut your [expletive] throat." The sheriff's report also noted that one of the men approached Williams to comply but was repelled by Williams' "horrible vaginal odor." In November, Williams was sentenced to 90 days in jail.

Irresistible: In September, Detroit Mayor Dave Bing appointed Ralph Godbee police chief – a job he had held on an interim basis for several months. Godbee had ascended to the job when Warren Evans was fired for, among other things, having an affair with a subordinate, Lt. Monique Patterson. Before turning to Evans, Patterson had had an affair with Godbee, also.

RECURRING THEMES

1) "Service" Animals: In July, Wayne Short's iguana was certified by the National Service Animal Registry and thus allowed to attend to him on the Boardwalk in Ocean City, Md., where she had previously been barred. Mayor Rick Meehan, eyeing the NSAR card, asked Short what sort of "service" Hillary provided, but Short declined to answer. 2) Wandering Kids: In October, firefighters were once again called to a clawtoy vending machine to extract a boy who had crawled up the toy-release chute - this time at a Walmart in Sun Prairie, Wis. As is often the case, the boy appeared to be joyously in his element among the toys and not immediately receptive to coaxing from firefighters or his parents.

GUILT-RIDDEN NEW JERSEY

When law enforcement officials staged a "Safe Surrender" program in Franklin,

N.J., in November (inviting fugitives to give up in exchange for lighter punishment), 3,900 came in over four days, but it turned out that 550 of them were not wanted on any warrant. Said a parole officer, "For some people, this seemed to be a way to check." A few days later, in Wayne, N.J., hospital pharmacy manager Leonardo Zoppa, 34, was summoned to a meeting with the hospital's security director but arrived noticeably nervous, inquired about the agenda, and eventually volunteered that it was he who had set up that secret surveillance camera in a men's restroom - and that he has "a problem." The security director said he was taken aback because the only purpose of the meeting was to advise Zoppa of routine security code changes.


A 'NEWS OF THE WEIRD' CLASSIC (FEBRUARY 2006)

Dave "The Dragon" Lockwood and his tournament-tested sons Max, 16; Jon, 13; and Ben, 10, of Silver Spring, Md., might become to competitive tiddlywinks what the Manning family of quarterbacks is to football, according to a January 2006 Washington Post story. Dave was previously ranked No. 1 in the English Tiddlywinks Association (and is currently No. 8, with Max No. 52). "Tiddlywinks doesn't sound very serious," said Max, but "[t]here's so much strategy." (For the uninformed: You mash a "squidger" down on a "wink" to propel it either into the "pot" or to "squop" it onto an opponent's wink to temporarily disable it.) Dave said he plans to get Britain's Prince Philip, a winker, to suggest tiddlywinks as a demonstration "sport" at London's 2012 Summer Olympics.

Hawkins Furniture Co. in Rosenberg builds furniture that your loved ones will be fighting over after you've passed on to a better place. Each table, chair, fireplace mantel, or cabinet is handcrafted

for strength, beauty, and functionality.

"Everything we build is built to last at least 100 years," the company's owner says. His name is William Hawkins, but even his wife calls him Hawkins. He's a good-sized man with arms like logs, hands the size of tree stumps, and an easy smile on his face. Only his thinning hair and graying beard hint that he's 62 years old.



Hawkins Furniture has

solidified a reputation for well-built furniture in a combination of rustic and modern styles. A Hawkins-built piece is a work of art as much as a piece of furniture. Some pieces, like benches or mantels, often follow the curvature of the original log, while other pieces are symmetrical. All of the home furnishings take advantage of the natural grain and color of the wood.

"I started using just-reclaimed wood," Hawkins says. "But then I discovered Texas Kiln Products." The Smithville lumberyard supplies him with sustainable harvested Texas woods. Besides mesquite and pecan, one of Hawkins' favorite woods is Texas black walnut.

A relatively rare wood, black walnut was brought to Texas from the eastern United States as a shade tree. In the Texas climate, the trees developed unique properties that produce a dark, hard finish. "Unfortunately, we often only get it when the tree is taken out because it is in the way of progress or has died," Hawkins says.

An auto mechanic for 20 years, Hawkins began his woodworking career more than 20 years ago when his brother asked him to paint some chairs at his furniture store in Houston. Being one of those guys who can do almost anything with his hands, Hawkins decided he liked working with wood more than fixing cars. His first project was a dining room table that he still uses. After several years of selling his creations wholesale, he opened his shop in a former tractor shop in downtown Rosenberg.

The showroom is full of his natural-wood furniture situated next to colorful chairs and cabinets by David Marsh, another Houston-area furniture-maker. A large picture window separates the sales room from the wood shop. "The original intent of the window was so customers could watch us work," Hawkins says. "But I usually take them into the shop to see and feel the wood up close." After all, it is all about the wood.

Hawkins Furniture Co. is at 1811 Avenue G, a block north of U.S. 90, in downtown Rosenberg. The showroom is open Tuesday through Friday from 10am to 5pm and Saturday from 10am to 3pm. About 35 former **Austin Aztex** supporters met Saturday for an exploratory session aimed at bringing minor-league soccer back to Austin, up to and including the option of creating a community-owned team from scratch. Notre Dame became the lowest seed ever to win the NCAA Division I women's championship with a 1-0 upset over Stanford, who for the second year in a row went into the final top-ranked and unbeaten and came out empty-handed.

In the lower divisions, **Hardin-Simmons** of Abilene, Texas, won its first NCAA Division III women's title on Saturday in San Antonio, while the Messiah men won their third straight D-III national title and eighth in the past 11 years. In Division II, Grand Valley State repeated as national women's champion and Northern Kentucky won its first title on the men's side.

This weekend the **Division I men** take the stage: The semifinals are Friday, Dec. 10 (Louisville vs. North Carolina, 7:30pm, ESPNU; Akron vs. Michigan, 10pm, ESPN2), and the College Cup Final is Sunday, Dec. 12, 3pm, on ESPN2.

Also on TV: a top-of-the-table English Premier League clash, Arsenal at Manchester United, live on ESPN2, Monday, Dec. 13, 1:55pm.

The rich get richer: This Wednesday was the final game day for the **European** Champions League group stage, and not surprisingly, as the dust settles, just five countries supply 14 of the 16 teams advancing to the knockout rounds. All four English teams advance (three as group winners), along with all three Italian teams and all three Spanish teams; Germany and France each advanced two teams, but from the other 13 countries represented in the group stage, only Copenhagen and Ukraine's Shakhtar Donetsk survive. 

The Trip to Bountiful

"Softly and tenderly, Jesus is calling, calling for you and for me." The old country hymn is never far from the lips of Carrie Watts, the elderly protagonist of Horton Foote's best-known play. She must sing it, she remarks

to a stranger at one point, a hundred times a day. Small wonder, then, that the hymn is a constant source of irritation to Mrs. Watts' daughter-in-law, Jessie Mae, setting on edge nerves already jangled from spending all day, every day, with the older woman in the close confines of a three-room apartment in Houston.

But in this quietly affecting drama, the Christian anthem serves a higher purpose than that of a flash point of conflict between the two women, or even a signifier that Mrs. Watts is a woman of abiding faith. It tells us her story. "Come home, come home," calls the refrain. "You who are weary, come home." Mrs. Watts, worn and unsettled from her years of captivity in a cramped, urban cell far from the farm of her youth, hears the call of her home, feels its pull, and is resolved to return to it, even if that means lying to her son, stealing away like a thief, and making the journey alone. Though we never hear it in the play, the hymn's third verse no doubt drives Mrs. Watts onward: "Time is now fleeting, the moments are passing, passing from you and from me; shadows are gathering, deathbeds are coming, coming for you and for me."

With the simplicity and modesty of that hymn, Austin Playhouse's production tracks this unlikely Ulysses' odyssey from Bayou City to Bountiful, the small town on the gulf where Mrs. Watts was reared and then reared Ludie, her sole surviving child of three. A cot, a rocker, a table, and a bed are all that are needed to suggest the tight quarters in which these characters live. Three chairs make up a bench in the bus station; when shifted, they become seats on the bus itself. We don't need trappings more elaborate than these any more than we need speeches that describe the characters' psychological conditions in extravagant detail. Foote's spare prose imparts so much about these figures; the common courtesies and passing references to past persons and events reveal their histories, something of the moral polestars that guide them, and their own measure of their lives against the tide of time.



Here, the burden of time on these people is eloquently expressed. Brian Coughlin's Ludie, troubled by his failure to provide a suitable home for his wife and mother and anxiously anticipating asking for a raise at work, shoulders his cares like physical weights: they seem to be perpetually pressing down on him, and projecting all the gentle decency and dignity that Coughlin does, his plight pierces our hearts. As Jessie Mae, Amy Kay Raymond exudes the brittleness of bone china, a quality she frequently exploits to comic effect with impressive finesse. But she also lets us glimpse beneath that jittery surface of the character's fearful sense of the ticking clock, of life turning in directions she hasn't foreseen and may not wish to follow.

Whether Jessie Mae grasps it or not, that concern is what's pushing her mother-in-law back to Bountiful. Time has led Mrs. Watts away from the person she was, and she feels the only place she can understand how she came to be who she is is her home. In Foote's cosmology, home is not a nostalgic abode of eternal sunshine and unconditional love; it is the place that shapes us, for good or ill, and thus the place where we may best know ourselves. Before she reaches it, Mary Agen Cox's Mrs. Watts is a portrait of agitation, nervously rubbing one wrist, darting glances this way and that, and if she isn't sitting in tight-lipped silence, she's chatting up a blue streak. But on the porch of the old Watts manse, now largely a ruin, Cox settles into a luminous calm. She speaks of the farms of yesterday and the forests of today that replaced them, but then imagines new farms tomorrow replacing those, and forests then overtaking them. As she locates herself in those cycles of history, Cox conveys it with a peace that passes all understanding.

Softly and tenderly, Foote tells us of one woman's passage back to her birthplace. With sensitivity and true feeling, director Don Toner and his talented company carry us home. Robert Faires










A Kodachrome Christmas

Here we have yet another Christmas show that proves the old adage: You can't ever have enough Christmas shows. If you peruse the performing arts listings this month, you'll find mostly seasonal holiday fare, and why not? No matter your religious

or spiritual background, the holiday season is magical, celebratory, and nostalgic, ripe with both comedic and dramatic possibilities.

Pat Hazell, the onetime Seinfeld writer who brought Austin The Wonder Bread Years and Bunk Bed Brothers, writes and directs this tale of Earlene Hoople, TV hostess of The Early Bird Morning Show on Dripping Springs Cable Access Channel 17. Earlene, at least as played by Marianne Curan - formerly of the Groundlings and a regular on The Tonight Show With Jay Leno – is like the nicest neighbor you've ever had or could possibly imagine having. She's funny; she's friendly; she's charming; she bakes. She does crafts, but you forgive her because the things she makes are so much fun. Being welcomed into her TV studio is like being welcomed into her home.

And what a wonderful home it is. Not to give too much away, but the set, designed by Steve Wheeldon, besides representing a very warm kitchen and appropriately decorated living room on the two sides of the stage, is rigged with Christmas surprises that Earlene reveals at appropriate moments. Earlene is taping her first Christmas special in front of a live audience, so the premise allows Curan to interact extensively with the crowd, and Curan does so in a completely nonthreatening, always fun manner. There are other "characters" in the show - a bird, appropriately enough, and a technician named Spider but the show belongs to Earlene.

Hazell knows the appeal of nostalgia, and he capitalizes on it here in a way similar to The Wonder Bread Years. One scene revolves around projecting a set of Kodachrome slides, and Earlene comments on the slides (one of which depicts a 5-year-old boy in full cowboy regalia, lighting his grandmother's cigarette) with great affection and humor, just as Hazell does in Wonder Bread. It's tried and true, and it works. Indeed, a lot of things in Hazell's script work, including an impromptu choir bell performance, the baking of Christmas cookies, and a presentation of awards for local Christmas crafts (the winner: a Christmas wreath made mostly of tiny green army men). These short scenes are interspersed with some well-made commercials offering such Catholic-oriented fare as the Praying Hands Vise and the law firm of Fatherson and Holygost.

If it sounds funny and almost utterly nonthreatening, that's because that's exactly what it is. It's charming and homey, and those are the show's greatest strengths. Still, it feels lighter than it perhaps should. Hazell introduces a subplot, one I'm hesitant to mention simply because I don't want to give too much away. Suffice it to say that the subplot, which actually plays a major role in tying up the story, feels almost thrown away, and given the brief running time of the show, adding something to flesh it out would likely be a help. That caveat aside, this is sweet, funny family fare from Sweetwood Productions and the Long Center to help you celebrate your holiday. - Barry Pineo

'TREE OF WISDOM' BY JOHN MARK SAGER

Butchery is an art, or at least a bladed craft, that can lacerate whatever membrane separates the realm of art from the quotidian world.

Writing is an art, and about that declaration there is little argument. Another craft that might be considered art: making books. Novels, collections of short stories, volumes of verse or prose or more prosaic palayer lovingly locked into concrete existence with paper and ink and diverse methods of binding.

There are butchers loose in the library, my darling. Butchers, yes, and not even St. Francis de Sales can stay their vorpal blades. Count this among your blessings: These butchers are true artists. See their new creations, deconstructions not of texts but of the physical objects themselves, at Studio2Gallery's "Library Foliage" show: books carved and compromised, fractured and framed, transmogrified to sculpture at least as deep and beautiful as the narratives they once offered.

John Mark Sager is the curator and featured artist of this show, and, though many of the other artists' works are superlative. it's not difficult to see why. The largest of Sager's works in this show, Hagia Sophia, is a complex structure of surpassing beauty, composed of books, cast iron, printing blocks, toy blocks, bits of calcite, and more; it's like some ancient gravestone marking the death of printed wisdom with a skill that brings printing's disparate elements to

new life. Sager has a suite of much smaller works, too, including The Voice of the City, in which he's taken an eponymous collection by O. Henry and, with the addition of steel, turned it into a curving urban landscape upon which stands a small, lone figure. It's simple and breathtaking.

Damian Priour, he of the Global Chair Project, hasn't wielded his cutting tools on a standing volume of paper and glue but has employed his signature combination of glass and limestone to create a new book object. Key, Volume 1 is composed of thin pages of glass encompassed by thick covers of native stone - the sort of thing, we imagine, used as a guest book where Bifröst, the rainbow bridge, enters the Norse gods' home of Asgard.

The assemblage called Bad Idea, by James Michael Starr, is a tiny book, its dark cover and grimy pages spread as if midflight, placed in exile, imprisoned in the middle of a tall and delicate cage of iron.

There are many more works here – by Jessica Maffia, Kathy Van Torne, James B. Campbell, and others - and they may well lock you in a cage of fascination for long pleasurable minutes, providing food for thought as you wander, like a character in a compelling story about the meat of literature, this bookishly holy abattoir. - Wayne Alan Brenner **GRAYDUCK GALLERY: DRAWN TOGETHER** Allen Brewer's drawings mix text and images on used documents to create strange palimpsests; Pamela Valfer reorganizes taxidermy and the kitschiness of flocked animal banks into something altogether different. 

Black Swan

D: Darren Aronofsky; with Natalie Portman, Mila Kunis, Vincent Cassel, Barbara Hershey, Winona Ryder, Benjamin Millepied. (R, 108 min.)

After 2008's conventionally plotted, overpraised *The Wrestler*, Darren Aronofsky dives back into another competitive sport of sorts in the deliciously wackadoodle Black Swan. This dramahorror hybrid, set within a New York ballet company, strikes

a tone more along the lines of the terrifying hallucinatories of Aronofsky's breakout film, Requiem for a Dream, revisiting, too, favorite themes of monster mommies and female hysteria. In an opening dream sequence, an overlooked ballerina named Nina Sayers (Portman) imagines herself dancing the lead

in Swan Lake; when she wakes in the morning, it's with a little girl's smile at a wish-fulfillment fantasy come true, however fleetingly. It's her last moment of uncomplicated bliss before a brutalizing descent into madness. The dream, it turns out, is prophetic: Nina is tapped early on by the troupe's manipulative, Diaghilevlike company director (Cassel) to play the Swan Queen, which is in fact two roles in one - the sweet, virginal White Swan, who awaits a true-love kiss from a prince, and her evil twin, the sexually provocative Black Swan, who lures the prince away. Nina is a tentative, bruises-easily young

woman who still lives with her overbearing mother (played by a marvelous Hershey; ever-hovering, she grooms her daughter like a maniacal monkey with nail clippers). Nina is a natural for the White Swan, but embodying the Black Swan is a stretch for her. Already crumbling under the punishing

> stresses of training, a twisted home life, and her own sexual repression, soon enough she's having scary visions of her body's metamorphosis into a swan. The Red Shoes and its theme of losing one's self to a part is an obvious influence, but it's another Powell

and Pressburger film, Black Narcissus, with its sex-starved nuns, that hits closer to home. Black Swan is part of a tradition - I hesitate to call it grand, but it's certainly cinematically fertile - of young women whose desire, sans an outlet, explodes into delirium. Potent stuff, that, (See also: Polanski's Repulsion and Kazin's Splendor in



the Grass; Aronofsky surely has.) In previous roles, Portman's petite frame was bolstered by a husky, lightly ribald voice; she could have handily dispatched the part of Nina's competitor, Lily, but then we wouldn't have had the surprise delight of Kunis - earthy, kittenish, calculating, and miles from her amusingly bratty turn on That '70s Show. But Portman has a few tricks up her sleeve, too: She strips herself of sensuality, even keying that husky voice to a higher, thinner pitch, and she wears a perplexed look throughout, as if she's trying to remember map directions and is stuck on whether the first turn is a right or a left. She's dynamite stuff – a very good dancer, too, at least to this untrained eye - and she looks appropriately hounded by a camera that stalks her from behind and circles her, ensnaring her, especially in the harrowing closing performance of Swan Lake (scored, of course, to thundering Tchaikovsky; it's never sounded so menacing). The entire last act is gid-

dily torturous to watch, with plot turns that are almost aggressively bewildering. But, as they say, let's go back to the text. The script (by Mark Heyman, John McLaughlin, and Andres Heinz, from a story by Heinz) tips its hand as soon as it spells out the plot of Swan Lake, and Aronofsky hammers the idea home every time a mirror fractures faces into multiples or Nina spots her own visage in people on the street: This is about flight from self. That simple fact is obscured - but not confused - by Aronofsky's expert use of horror-film technique via jump cuts and creepy audio cues, wherein even the squish of a cut grapefruit is amplified to queasy, supremely uneasy effect. But what startles most is how exquisitely controlled his command of so much madness truly is. He mashes high art and low, classical and camp, and whips it all up with a kind of baroque frenzy for a sumptuously unnerving, singular experience. - Kimberley Jones

If you're sick and tired of the saccharine explosion of treacly holiday fare that began bombarding us somewhere around Halloween, and if you prefer the pre-Christian rites and pagan revelations upon which so much of the current, Christianized calendar conveniently hangs, then you could do far worse than this year's Fantastic Fest horror favorite, Rare Exports: A Christmas Tale. Set in the icy north of Finland, this small, dark gem out-Scrooges Scrooged and makes Bad Santa look like a feel-good film. Rare Exports depicts the travails of a tiny community of Laplanders forced into battle against a resurrected ur-Santa, complete with massive, goatlike horns, cloven hoofs, and a legion of scrawny, naked, ancient "elves" that look as though they just wandered in from the set of Uwe Boll's Auschwitz. Creepy, no? It's not all blood and death and boiling children alive, though. Rare Exports subverts the usual holiday drivel on multiple levels, adding a noncloying amount of humor and one really cute

little kid to what is essentially Rawhead Rex meets 30 Days of the Night Before Christmas. Director Helander barely scratches the surface of one hell of a great idea, but what this Christmas Tale does, it does with wild abandon. When a multinational corporation begins taking seismic samples (so they say) from the peak of the forbidding Korvatunturi mountain, beneath which 11-year-old Pietari (Onni Tommila) and his widowed, reindeer-butcher father live, odd things begin to happen. The valley's reindeer turn up eviscerated, effectively throwing the local reindeer-based economy into sudden tumult. Unnervingly humanlike tracks are found in the snow and, even more disturbingly, outside Pietari's bedroom window. Clutching his favorite stuffed animal and arming himself with his trusty shotgun, Pietari hits the history books and uncovers the disturbing truth about the real Santa. Jolly is not in this crimson nightmare's repertoire, and all that jazz with the presents? Totally inaccurate. This holiday housebreaker is more likely to feast on your sweetbreads than on your cookies and milk. Much of Rare Exports is seen through the eyes of its preteen protagonist, which explains some of the story's minor omissions (who, exactly, hired this nefarious multinational mining outfit, and why exactly?). But quibbling about such things would seem to be a fine way to fast-track myself onto you-know-who's Naughty List. Nuts to that; I need new socks. - Marc Savlov ★★★ Alamo Drafthouse South

VISION: FROM THE LIFE OF HILDEGARD VON BINGEN

D: Margarethe von Trotta; with Barbara Sukowa, Heino Ferch, Hannah Herzsprung, Alexander Held, Lena Stolze, Sunnyi Melles. (NR, 111 min., subtitled)

The fifth collaboration between writer/ director von Trotta and beautiful leading lady Sukowa, both icons of the German

New Wave, finds them in a nunnery. Specifically, they have combined forces to tell the life story of Hildegard von Bingen, the 12th century Benedictine nun, a woman of many talents and mystical visions. Throughout her career, she composed music that remains distinctive among medieval works, wrote plays and poetry, authored several books that described her visions, and oversaw the Benedictines' production of illuminated manuscripts. She was also an herbalist who used her knowledge for medicinal and ecological purposes. Within the male-dominated hierarchy of the church, Hildegard figured out how to use diplomacy and strategy to achieve her aims. It is for all these reasons and more that Hildegard has become a subject of renewed study for feminist scholars in recent decades. Not much is known about Hildegard's early life: Born only a couple years before the turn of the millennium, Hildegard was a sickly child who was prone to visions and, at the age of 8, was given - or tithed - by her parents to the church. She grew up in the monastic life, and her accomplishments began to earn notice after 1136, when she was elected to be the magistra of her community by her fellow nuns. Von Trotta and Sukowa create a very nuanced study of Hildegard, one that imbues the figure with human foibles in a number sufficient to keep at bay any hagiographic impulses. Envy and competition are shown to be issues with which Hildegard and the other sisters struggle (although, to be fair, the nuns probably didn't view them as "issues" so much as sins). Nevertheless, Hildegard is clearly portrayed as a forward thinker: She argues with her superior, Abbot Kuno (Held), and instructs her selfflagellation-prone sisters and brethren that "God wants mercy, not sacrifice." Another time, she condemns the "double standard" (there's that 21st century terminology again) that allows a monk to remain cloistered after he impregnates a nun. Her plays, during which the nuns doffed their habits, costumed themselves in white silk gowns, and let down their hair, caused some conniptions among the more ascetic Benedictine monks, some of whom already had reasons to resent Hildegard's shining light. Light, however, is exactly what is missing from this biopic. Von Trotta's film is informative, instructive, intriguing, and polished, yet it finds no ecstasy - religious or otherwise. Though these nuns can sing, they are no singing nuns - which is a good thing, for sure, although a little more pizzazz wouldn't hurt. - Marjorie Baumgarten

THE WARRIOR'S WAY D: Sngmoo Lee; with Jang Dong-gun, Kate Bosworth, Geoffrey Rush, Danny Huston, Tony Cox, Ti Lung, Nic Sampson, Ryan Richards. (R. 100 min.)

Although it's a strange, not-quite-successful but visually entertaining attempt to merge the tropes of the classic American Western with those of the sword-wielding chopsocky genre. The Warrior's Way is drained of much of its presumed power by a distinct "been there, seen that" vibe. Director Kim Ji-woon (who, like Sngmoo Lee, emerged from the thriving South Korean film industry) already finessed this sort of stylistic collision with 2008's The Good, the Bad, the Weird. Even Takashi Milke, years ago, joined the duster-wearing, sharp weapon-and-six-shooter-wielding fray (with Quentin Tarantino, not surprisingly, in tow) for 2007's Sukivaki Western Diango. It goes back further than that, of course: Without Akira Kurosawa's Yojimbo and Seven Samurai, there would be no A Fistful of Dollars or The Magnificent Seven. All of the aforementioned rely, to one degree or another, on special effects to achieve their all-encompassing stylistic immersion, but The Warrior's Way goes overboard to a significantly silly degree and capsizes due to a veritable tsunami of CGI. Granted, ninjas are involved, but does the world of fantastic filmmaking really need another slo-mo shot of a bullet or blade speeding toward its intended target? Enough already. Arterial blood sprays do not equal passion, and although first-time director Lee fills every single frame with enough eye candy to drive a person blind - you could remove the human cast entirely and the remaining sunsets alone would make for grand, trippy fun - it's ultimately too much of a good thing. Yang (Jang) is an assassin on the lam who is forced into self-imposed exile in the old American West when he refuses to kill his rival clan's only surviving member (a child). Jang has cheekbones that look like leftover props form Tsui Hark's Swordsman II and rogue panache to match; unfortunately, that's not enough to carry this heaving, overwrought pseudo epic. Surrounding the taciturn, archetypal Lone Wolf and Cubesque character played by South Korean superstar Jang with an English-speaking cast that includes a wildly hammy Rush as the town tosspot does little to offset the film's overall "everything and the kitchen sink" tone. There's so much over-the-top acting going on - Huston's scarred, evil Colonel; Bosworth's knife-fighting, Annie Oakley OD Lynne – that at times it appears the actors attempted to out-act the digital set-pieces they knew would eventually subsume them. Prescient move on their part, but it doesn't quite work. Burlesque bumps and grinds. And then it continues to grind and grind and grind. This new musical leaves no cliché unturned as it struggles to find the heart of cabaret. The girls at the Burlesque Lounge on the Sunset Strip dance onstage in exotic underwear while lip-synching risqué numbers, but no clothing is removed. Aguilera stars as Ali, the orphaned Iowa waitress who ditches her job, straps on her platform pumps, and heads for the glittering lights of Hollywood. The dialogue plods along predictably and the performance numbers are edited like a cut-and-paste mosaic. Cher was a shrewd casting choice in terms of upping the film's camp cred, but the diva plays it straight as the club's proprietor and den mother. Tess. As Burlesque ground along its obvious and well-worn path. my inner voice indeed shouted, "Take it off," though my request was directed toward the projection booth rather than the dancers onstage. Phillips steers this road-trip movie through a wicked variety of set-pieces and celebrity guest cameos. The problem with Due Date is that it is less funny at 95 minutes than it is in its succinct trailers. In between the jokes, the darker moments of Due Date emerge and deflate some of the froth. Nevertheless, in its best moments, the film's duo of Galifianakis and Downey Jr. remind us of a bickering Laurel & Hardy digging themselves out of another fine mess. Perry has brushed up his directing skills, though his plainspoken, unsubtle aesthetic is an uncomfortable match for the fragility of Shange's poetic monologues. Still, Elise, Newton, Devine, Rose, Washington, and Rashad find the pulse of their characters and are able to convey something of their emotions, even when they lack clarity and backstory. There is a lot of turmoil captured in these vignettes: date rape, infanticide, promiscuity, backalley abortion, pathological religiosity, and AIDS, to name but a few. Four Lions is set in Sheffield. 150 miles north of London, and details the bumbling efforts of a group of radicalized Muslims who dream of becoming suicide bombers. Faisal (Akhtar) is soft-spoken and maybe soft in the head; Waj (Novak) is dim but eager to please; Barry (Lindsay), a white convert, is a bilious fanatic; and Hassan (Ali) is a wannabe rapper just looking for a community. But leader Omar (Ahmed) is a genuinely politicized and embittered young man with a wife and son. Four Lions is a riot of physical comedy. and much of the dialogue is sneakily hilarious in its sheer banality. Director Morris, in his first feature film, imperceptibly shifts from pure satire to accommodate a more complete and, yes, humanizing portrait of the conflicted jihadis. The Girl Who Kicked the Hornet's Nest is the concluding chapter of Stieg Larsson's phenomenal clutch of paranoiac Svenska-noir novels and the Swedish films based on his work. The follow-up films don't quite live up to the visceral, chilly, black-leather Euro-punch of director Niels Arden Oplev's original film. But they all star Rapace, who so utterly embodies the character of Lisbeth Salander as a sort of forcibly detached, hideously scarred - mentally, physically, emotionally - force majeure that it's inconceivable, for now, that any actor would have the brass balls to place herself at the center of the forthcoming, inevitable Hollywood remakes. (David Fincher will direct.) If The Girl Who Kicked the Hornet's Nest lacks a measure of the sexually turbocharged torque of its precursors, the fault lies not with Rapace or Nygyist, but with a concluding storyline that breathlessly attempts to weave all those loose ends from the previous films into a cunningly crafted hangman's knot. When Voldemort's minions, the Death Eaters, storm the Ministry, Harry and best friends Hermione (Watson) and Ron (Grint) go underground to find and destroy the remaining Horcruxes, talismans in which Voldemort safeguarded splinters of his soul. Deathly Hallows is still truthful to the spirit of these decent, sometimes goofy kid-characters, whom we've watched grow up in the course of 10 years. They remain fundamentally the same, only now with jaws set hard from troubled times. They've been through something epic, and for the first time, truly, so have we. Director Ferguson (No End in Sight), however, illuminates the situation with this detailed yet engaging documentary analysis narrated by Matt Damon. Inside Job uncovers little that hasn't already been reported elsewhere, but Ferguson does an excellent job of organizing the presentation and showcasing his clear-eyed perspective of the American people as the victims of Wall Street insiders who are themselves victims of their own greed and inflated self-worth. Inside Job is divided into five digestible sections: How We Got Here, the Bubble, the Crisis, Accountability, and Where We Are Now. Ferguson's provocative, incredulous questioning is one of the greatest lessons of Inside Job. Jake Gyllenhaal has always done better with edgy material that subverts his sunny, smiling look. Gyllenhaal plays Jamie, a Pfizer rep who, when he lands the new Viagra account, happily combines his two great loves; sex and hustling When free-spirit artist Maggie (Hathaway) enters the picture, the pair embarks on something of a nostrings-attached sex romp. Zwick's film bloats into sentimental hash when their love affair becomes complicated by Maggie's early-stage Parkinson's disease and creeping feelings of real, not entirely welcome love for each other. There's nothing wrong with sentimental hash, but whenever Zwick catches the rhythm of one mood, he skips the needle to try on another one. Megamind is a self-professed supervillain, an alien who was orphaned young and crafted an identity in counterpoint to another foundling who fell to Metro City, USA, on the same day - the buff, boffo Metro Man (voiced by Pitt). But what's a big baddie to do when his nemesis and prime motivator takes an extended vacation? Megamind gets existential, but only in blips, and while it is never anything less than vibrant and exceedingly clever, it is also a rather slight thing for such mega-sized proportions. Hired to turn around the disastrous ratings of a national morning show, Becky in turn hires a seasoned newsman, Mike Pomeroy (Ford), to co-anchor the program with sugar (oncamera) and spice (off-) Colleen Peck (Keaton). Mike

is hell-bent on sabotaging what he rightfully considers to be a gig way, way beneath him, and the bulk of Morning Glory is spent tracking Becky's uphill battle to convince Mike to play nice for the camera. "Play nice" may very well be the mantra of Michell (Notting Hill), a director of excessive sentimentality and empty stylishness. Well-acted and ingratiating, with at least one howlingly funny sequence, Morning Glory had the capacity to be a smarter, tarter picture, though it's not bad as is. 




True Grit

True Grit (2010) D: Joel Coen and Ethan Coen; with Jeff Bridges, Hailee Steinfeld, Josh Brolin, Matt Damon. Austin Film Society: Sneak Peek. True Grit opens on Dec. 22, but catch an early sneak of the film that was made partially in Austin and at Austin Studios. Tickets, which include access to an afterparty, go on sale to the public at noon on Thursday; see www.austintheatre.org or go to the Paramount box office. THE NEXT THREE DAYS D: Paul Haggis; with Russell Crowe, Elizabeth Banks, Ty Simpkins, Olivia Wilde. (PG-13, 122 min.)

Haggis presents a mishmash of genres in this redo of Fred Cavayé's 2008 French film Pour Elle. Working with such familiar - and potentially dramatic - ingredients as jailbreaks, the wrongly accused, and femmes fatales, Haggis culls the least interesting bits from these scenarios to make a fatally confused film. A lumbering, sleepily engaged Crowe stars as literature professor John Brennan, whose wife, Lara (Banks), is abruptly accused of murder in the film's opening minutes and carted off to iail and sentenced to life in prison. Along the way, Haggis tosses in everything from mild puzzlers (what the hell are Liam Neeson, Olivia Wilde, Daniel Stern, and Brian Dennehy all doing in go-nowhere bit parts?) to real plot head-scratchers (how did Brennan advance from "where do the bullets go?" to a shoot-'emup at a meth lab in a matter of scenes?). There's only one psychologically intriguing character in the film, and she spends most of it behind bars.

127 HOURS D: Danny Boyle: with James Franco, Kate Mara, Amber Tamblyn, Treat Williams, Kate Burton, John Lawrence. (R, 94 min.)

Calm, cool, and tear-your-hair-out exciting, 127 Hours is an archetypal tale of man vs. nature vs. himself. Danny Boyle adapts Aron Ralston's "trapped in the wilderness" memoir with gripping aplomb. Ralston, after a morning of mountain-biking and cavorting in underground swimming holes with a pair of newbie female hikers (Tamblyn and Mara), falls from nature's grace and lands in a horrific situation: His arm is crushed and unable to be freed, he's low on water, and absolutely no one is aware of his plight. It's a bad trip in every sense of the phrase. 127 Hours is an unrelenting tour de force but it's also an unforgettable examination of

the human spirit under extreme duress. The fact that Franco gives the performance of his career is the icing on the cake. Fair warning, oh squeamish ones: 127 Hours does not shy away from Ralston's ultimate method of obtaining egress from his predicament. Which is exactly as it should be. Marc Savlov

Believe the hype: Paranormal Activity 2 is exactly what you think or hope it is. I loathed the first film, but its cheap shocks and wait ... wait ... wait ... gotchas were a box-office cash machine. Paranormal Activity 2 is something of a prequel to Oren Peli's initial film. But, most importantly, does it scare the hell out of you? Well, yes, it does. As it turns out, the new pair of victims, Kristi and Dan (Grayden and Boland), are related to the previous couple by blood ties. Plus, they have a child and a German shepherd in tow. The entire production is faux cinema verité, captured remarkably via security apparatus and nanny cam. That's the pitch, really: Supernatural stuff happens, and the audience gets to view it in edited real time. Granted, this inevitable follow-up is considerably spookier than its predecessor, but only in terms of the amount of jump-out-of-your-seatiness. It's not hell, but it's close. Proof that the artistic collision between the aging baby boomers and their comic-bookobsessed progeny makes for some strange, but entertaining, bedfellows, Red features four leads with a combined age of 257 – add the grand, Methuselean Borgnine and you get a round 350 - who alternate between waxing eloquent on the ephemerality of youth and resuscitating said salad days by blowing shit up real good. Yee-haw! Willis plays a retired CIA badass named Frank Moses who, when the Agency decides to clean out the old guard, is forced to round up his Cold War "associates" - Freeman's rest-home-residing Joe, Cox's bearish ex-Soviet Ivan, Malkovich's paranoid comic foil Marvin, and the elegant Mirren as ex-MI6 operative Victoria. Red is, at its heart, a rom-com, guns 'n' bombs mash-up that poses serious questions about the role of the aged in a youth-mad, globalized system and then answers them with a smirk and a whole lot of terrifically choreographed action set-pieces. "Don't go toward the light" is the advice given to patients trying to resist death's embrace. The advice might also prove wise for the characters in Skyline, an effects-heavy thriller about an alien invasion of Los Angeles. I'd use the term "science fiction" to describe Skyline but the movie decidedly lacks both science and fiction. The effects in this new movie are, indeed, quite stunning. However, Skyline, directed by the Brothers Strause, is the kind of movie in which the characters make so many dumb moves and repeat the same trite exclamations that audiences love to watch them in order to yell mocking comments back at the screen. Logical questions arrive with almost every new sequence. Most curious of all, however, is how the filmmakers could pass up the obvious joke opportunities about Angelenos being done in by their "brainless" inability to resist bright, shiny objects. Fincher's blisteringly entertaining The Social Network touches down in the calm before the storm, before social media rewrote the rules on how information moves. We first meet the eventual founder of Facebook, Mark Zuckerberg (Eisenberg), in a bar, having drinks with his girlfriend (Mara). He is callous, socially inept, and ravenously ambitious - the boy who would be king, not yet fixed on what the kingdom will look like. The Social Network cuts with ease from flashbacks of Zuckerberg's undergraduate days to depositions related to two concurrent lawsuits brought against him. Although the legal proceedings provide a handy framework for the film, who did what to whom, when, and with how much premeditated bloodlust is of ancillary concern to the film's layered examination of an

The venerable Disney animators have climbed aboard both the CGI and 3-D bandwagons for their latest holiday release, which reworks the Brothers Grimm fairy tale Rapunzel. The classic hallmarks of Disney animation are all here: stunning attention to the details of nature and the inclusion of an evil mother figure as a trigger for the storyline. Rapunzel's hair should be listed as one of the story's main characters, so intrinsic is it to the film's appeal. As voiced by Moore, Rapunzel is a spunky gal, capable of defending herself and singing sturdily. Tony Award-winner Murphy brings stage showmanship to her musical interludes as Mother Gothel, which drip with sarcasm and biting wit. The songs by Alan Menken and Glenn Slater are fun but unmemorable, however. Even though the sight of Rapunzel's shimmering hair and scenes of flickering lanterns across the skyline are visual wonders, the biggest reactions to the animation seemed to come from scenes of classic physical comedy. Unstoppable is a lot like speed. Not the movie, the amphetamine. It's manic and wearyingly predictable, and as soon as it begins, you know exactly how it's going to end: with a hard, fast crash (and the requisite yakkety epilogue). Oh, but what a fun pitch meeting it must have been: "There's this

unmanned train, see, powered up at full throttle, see, and it's headed toward population! And Denzel Washington plays a heroic motorman who recently lost his wife to cancer! And that new Captain Kirk guy's the rookie conductor, and he has a broken heart! How can it miss?!" How indeed? Unstoppable is interminable, especially for connoisseurs of the action spectacle. They will recall with fondness such far better films as Runaway Train or even Von Ryan's Express. Director Scott tosses the occasional foreign object onto the track from time to time, but in the end *Unstoppable* is derailed by its own one-track premise. Bell plays Marni, a former high school loser who has remade herself as a successful public relations exec. That reinvention is threatened, however, when she returns home to discover her big brother (Wolk) is about to wed her high school nemesis, Joanna (Yustman). Almost as an afterthought, You Again poses an interesting question what if our long-ago bullies were just as psychically scarred by the tormenting as their tormented victims were? - but that curveball is buried under a lot of gunk: dance-offs, sing-alongs, awkward exes, and a dirty-talking Betty White blasting through, I'm afraid, the last bits of her novelty. YOU WILL MEET A TALL DARK

In Allen's latest romantic roundelay, You Will Meet a Tall Dark Stranger, it is libido that ostensibly drives all the characters - Alfie (Hopkins) to ditch his senioraged wife, Helena (Jones), for a nubile new bride, his daughter Sally (Watts) to make eyes at her boss (Banderas), and Sally's failed novelist husband, Roy (Brolin, boorish and frankly unbearable), to court their comely neighbor (Pinto) - but it's a weirdly inert kind of libido. In theory, there are some interesting ideas here: How disaffection pushes these characters to marinate in drink; how they assiduously avoid truth-telling, only to be confronted with inevitable fallout of so many lies. But in practice, the characters are one-dimensional cutouts kept at a dogged remove. Their miseries are a bore - maybe to Allen, too, who abruptly ends the film just when it finally catches some dramatic traction. Still, who can blame him? Without so much as a 7-inch single or live performance to its name, Mister Heavenly – a collaboration between Islands captain Nick Diamonds.

Man Man key gypsy Honus Honus, and Modest Mouse drummer Joe Plummer – signed last month to Sub Pop and coined a new genre: "doom-wop." Recent YouTube footage suggests a combination of terminal love songs and 1940s-style doo-wop, filtered through their individual strains of indie rock.

"In this band there are definitely three strong-headed and strongwilled individuals," Diamonds relays the day after the band's first performance. "It's like a dictator conference. There might be some warheads that go off."

"We're not trying to underline that because we don't want it to come across like a Dogstar situation," laughs Diamonds, referencing Keanu Reeves' pitiful rock band. "He's very musical. I think he has better chops than any of us at our respective instruments, without a doubt."

My father is a huuuge fan of your NPR radio show. Every Saturday, he is a devoted listener. At the weekend cottage up north, the reception is sketchy at best. When your show is scheduled to come on, my father disappears like clockwork. Finally we find him camped out in the driveway, in Mom's Cadillac, tuned in to your show, no less, on the car stereo. He argues the car stereo has a better receiver than a conventional radio. I tell him he's going to drain Mom's battery. I relayed this story to a co-worker, and we decided it was a great topic of conversation for Click and Clack. Is the car radio that much more superior than your standard FM stereo receiver? And how many shows can he listen to before he drains Mom's battery? Thanks, and say "hi" to Ralph sitting in Daina's Caddy! I inda

TOM: He probably doesn't even like our show, Linda. He's just hiding from the grandkids.

After all, normal isn't very


entertaining is it? The result is a whole slew of aberrant dress and bizarre behavior. Consider the questionably pedophiliac, body-mutilating, androgynous insanity of Michael Jackson (arguably one of the greatest enter-

tainers of all time), or the karate chopping, UFO-sighting, rhinestone jumpsuit-wearing (also questionably pedophiliac) Elvis, who may or may not have been involved with the FBI, CIA, and extraterrestrials. Throw in a goat, a monkey, and a 50-gallon drum of Vaseline, and you have one seriously bizarre clusterfuck. Unfortunately, in the music world that's the kind of thing it takes to get noticed. Liberace was probably at one time a fairly unremarkable Polish kid from Wisconsin; Madonna was just a high school cheerleader from Pontiac, Mich.; the members of Kiss were just hardworking metal musicians from the boroughs; and GG Allin was just a boy from Vermont who was born with the name Jesus Christ Allin, cross-dressed for the last three years of high school, did a stint at the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Clown College, and made a career(?) out of urinating, defecating, flinging feces, bleeding, and vomiting onstage. OK, so maybe Jesus was crazier than a shit-house rat from start to finish, but he still managed to get gigs, and that's the point really. In the music business, there is always someone willing to encourage and reward insanity. Lady Gaga is a pretty good singer and all, but could she make it without the meat dress? Or the bubble dress? Or the Kermit the Frog dress? At some point her career will slow down and she'll end up paying Franc Fernandez to design her a dress out of dalmatian puppy hides, human placentas, or maybe circumcised foreskins. At some point you either decide to wear the hamster carcass earrings or end up doing matinee shows in Branson, Mo. In music, you're either on your way up or on your way down. Thankfully Austin has an organization that offers musicians opportunities to seek help from people who are trained to deal with psychological and substance abuse issues. It's called the SIMS Foundation, and this Saturday it's hosting the SIMS Benefit Bash at the Austin Music Hall, a fundraising concert featuring a who's who of Austin Musicians: Eliza Gilkyson, Ian McLagan, Will Sexton, David Garza, Graham Reynolds, Kat Edmonson, Don Harvey, Brownout, Lauren Larson, Ruby Jane Smith, Amy Cook, Mark Andes, and Scrappy Jud Newcomb, among others. For less than the price of a round of Jäger shots, you can show some musicians how much you appreciate them in a way that actually does them some good.






