

AUSTIN HAS SHOT AT REFORM

Dear Editor,

Thanks for Josh Rosenblatt's report on Laura Pressley's decision to run for City Council Place 2 ["Pressley Settles on Martinez," News, Jan. 27]. Historically, it's fitting that Eastside activists and anyone who supports geographic representation in Austin should focus on places 5 and 2. The last attempt to defy the gentlemen's agreement was in 1997, when incumbent Gus Garcia switched from Place 5 to Place 2, opening up a seat for more minority candidates. In Place 5, Manuel Zuniga was the top candidate, with 43% (25,309 votes). Bill Spelman, a white academic running for the traditionally Hispanic seat, was a distant second with only 28%. Far from a publicrelations disaster, Spelman won the run-off. with 2,000 votes fewer than Zuniga's first-round total. Garcia won Place 2, but his effort to reform the City Council election system failed.

So the incumbents in places 2 and 5 owe their positions to the reprehensible gentlemen's agreement, although they have long professed support for single-member districts. In fall 2009, they had the opportunity to take the lead and put an independent districting body in place before the release of the census data in 2011, so that mapping of single-member districts could be taken directly to the people. Martinez and Spelman both indicated to reform advocates that the time was right, but instead, they did nothing. Now we are stuck in the same old, befuddling charter revision process, dithering over who should or should not decide on district boundaries.

Austin has a real shot at reform this year if East Austin and all supporters of geographic representation can rally behind strong East Austin candidates in both Place 2 and Place 5.

Thanks again for your coverage of Austin city politics.

F1 UNRESPONSIVE

Dear Editor,

The F1/Circuit of the Americas article "Formula Farrera," News, Jan. 13] by Richard Whittaker raises a legitimate concern: Can a race track both advance the cause of environmental sustainability and curtail its sizable footprint?

As a direct contributor to the list of city of Austin sustainability measures and someone who knows the importance of pollution prevention, I have witnessed the unresponsiveness by F1 employees and their attorneys on the suggestions to reduce the site development impacts related to air quality.

A trio, including a Texas state representative, a Travis County staff member, and a city of Austin manager, have not been able to get someone from F1/COTA to emerge as a leader to address how to reduce air pollution since the early summer 2011. The city of Austin, driven by citizen initiative, has developed a list of voluntary mea-



sures to reduce both ground-level air emissions and greenhouse gas emissions from the site development process.

These measures could be used during all aspects of the site development as well as during building construction. Green building as pioneered by Austin Energy and the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED rating system are among the most important environmental programs ever launched, but they lack a robust rating tool to incentivize air pollution reduction during the site development.

A longer-term concern is to what extent will the F1/COTA track accelerate urban sprawl and the cost of future infrastructure that is disproportionately paid for by existing ratepayers instead of the direct beneficiaries.

THERE IS A LONG-EXISTING FORM OF INDEFINITE DETENTION

Dear Editor,

In response to "Letters at 3AM: NDAA: Obama's Betrayal" [Jan. 27]: What I find interesting about all the uproar over the indefinite detention provision in NDAA is that critics of it seem to forget that this is really nothing new. Even before Bush signed the Authorization for Use of Military Force in 2001, we had a long-existing form of indefinite detention - it's called our prison and jail system.

As of 2009, 3.1% of the U.S. population was under correctional supervision. That's a higher rate than in any other country, including Russia and China. Sixty percent of the incarcerated population are nonviolent offenders.



With programs for rehabilitation and prison reentry programs slashed to the bone, we created a system of de facto, indefinite detention for millions of Americans.

And it's a system of indefinite detention that targets not so much the very rare foreign or domestic terrorist, but rather the poor, the communities of color, and the people who can't afford a good lawyer.

Maybe to prevent more legislation like the NDAA we need to zap the problem at its source: a general acceptance by Americans of incarceration as a remedy for all infractions against the law.

And then we may need to turn a very bright light on our own indifference to the plights of those we don't quite relate to.

It's possible that NDAA is not the sudden betrayal to the Bill of Rights that it might appear to be, but is rather the result of a systemic, chronic condition found in this country as far back as the Sedition Act. And that we, by our indifference to overincarceration here at home, are as much traitors to our own best interests as any politician has ever been.


Dear Editor.



They're Not 'Pro-Life'

The health care cuts are anti-women and anti-family

By the numbers, this is what "pro-life" looks like:

• 22: Texas clinics - providing preventive health care services to women - completely defunded

• \$19 million: Remaining annual state budget for family planning, down from \$50 million

• **60,000**: Women whom the Department of State Health Services estimates can be served with that amount, compared with the average 244,000 served annually since 2005

• 184,000: Women served by the federally funded Women's Health Program in 2010, now in danger of losing services because of state's insistence on excluding Planned Parenthood clinics (2011 estimate: 185,000-200,000)

• 11: Texas Planned Parenthood clinics none of which provided abortion services closed for lack of funding

• 33,974: Screenings for sexually transmitted infections provided by those 11 clinics

• 1.5 million: Number of Texas women in need of basic, preventative health care service; before last year's cuts, about 15% of those women were receiving services

• 22%: Anticipated increase in the number of Texas abortions in the absence of access to reproductive health services

It is difficult to summarize how hypocritical and counterproductive is the right-wing assault on women's health care, disguised as a

righteous defense against abortion or Planned Parenthood. The list above features some of the most striking statistics from Jordan Smith's ongoing coverage of the Texas women's health care crisis, revisited today ("The Destruction of Texas Health Care," p.18) because the budget cuts enacted last spring are rippling through the state's patchwork system.

That list doesn't even touch on what will be an inevitable spike in Medicaid births with their increased costs (thousands of dollars for unplanned births instead of hundreds for preventive care) or the consequent pressure on local property taxes. It does not address the Texas health insurance scandal, which leaves 20% or more of the population with little effective access to preventive health care, now further restricted. Nor does it touch specifically on Austin-area numbers, where CommUnityCare will be expected nearly to double its intake of basic-needs clients from defunded clinics, with virtually no increase in funding.

That is what "pro-life" looks like.

- > Former Council Member Brigid Shea announced her candidacy for mayor Wednesday, taking on incumbent Lee Leffingwell, who is running for a second term. Also filing with the city clerk for mayor was council foghorn Clay Dafoe, plus the otherwise mysterious Daniel Krawisz and Nicholas Ryan Lucier.
- > If AISD trustees thought the new year would see an end to opposition to a partnership with IDEA Public Schools, they were seriously wrong. At the Jan. 30 board meeting, members of Occupy Austin read letters written by staff, students, and parents from both AISD and IDEA campuses, highlighting continuing concerns and accusing the district of suppressing any criticism of the deal.
- Capitulating to right-wing political pressure, the Susan B. Komen Foundation announced suspension of support for Planned Parenthood health clinics nationwide. Over the past six years, reported Sarah Wheat of Planned Parenthood of the Texas Capital Region, local Komen funds have underwritten breast health education and breast exams for low-income and underserved women.
- Redistricting wars continue, with negotiations at an impasse and the San Antonio federal courts telling all parties that they must reach an agreement on maps by Feb. 6 or face rescheduling the primaries – again (see "April 3 Primary in Doubt," p.15).
- Prosecutors say they may review the 1985 murder of Natalie Antonetti, mother of local musician Johnnie Goudie, to determine whether there may be a link to Mark Alan Norwood, charged with the 1986 killing in Georgetown of Christine Morton; both women were bludgeoned to death in the early morning in their homes. Dennis Davis, a former boyfriend of Antonetti's, was convicted of her murder last vear.
- Cry for Texas medical insurance companies: They will have to spend 80% of all premiums on actual medical care (instead of advertising, bonuses, etc.). The Texas Department of Insurance had requested a waiver allowing firms four years to reach the target established by the Affordable Care Act, but on Jan. 27, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services rejected the request.
- With Texas' school-finance system heading back to court, outgoing Senate Finance Chair **Steve Ogden**, R-Bryan, announced on Jan. 30 that he wants Gov. Rick Perry to call a summer special session on education funding.
- A large section of Downtown lost power Saturday night, Jan. 28, when two transformers were damaged. Austin Energy reports that power was restored to most affected businesses by the next morning; the cause has not been officially determined.
- Significant rainfall in the area has allowed the Travis County Commissioners Court to lift its burn ban, which had been in place since lan 17
- Good news and bad news for Ron Paul in the GOP's Florida presidential primary. First, the bad news: He came fourth in a four-horse race won comfortably by Mitt Romney. The good news? He doubled he share of the vote from his 2008 run ... to 7%.

Mandating Suffering

On the presidential campaign trail, our governor bragged about defunding Planned Parenthood, so these numbers – especially the anticipated increase in abortions – should make him happy. Ditto for state Sens. Bob Deuell and Tommy Williams, whose self-aggrandizing campaigns against Planned Parenthod are bearing such rich fruit.

We can also applaud the rest of the Republican presidential field, who pretend that in attacking "Obamacare" they're defending "personal freedom" against "federal mandates," rather than mandating that many millions of Americans do without basic health care, under a very old principle: The rich and the poor are equally free to do without health insurance.

Elections Matter

I asked a couple of local legislators who watched the budget carnage last year to comment on the current health care situation and any prospects they might see for a different direction.

Rep. Donna Howard emphasized that the effect of the cuts is to increase expenses while pushing those costs down on local jurisdictions. "We've already seen that there's an association between unintended pregnancies and lack of prenatal care, with problems that may occur with premature deliveries, with low-birth-weight infants, with subsequent issues of health for the child as the child develops, as well as impacts with the woman being able to get a job, and be able to provide child care. The list goes on and on. There's a real multiplier here and the impacts of the cost on society - just by virtue of not giving this woman a couple of hundred dollars in preventive care."

Rep. Elliott Naishtat noted similar consequences: "The programs we're talking about – women's health services – we're talking about well-woman checkups, and breast and cervical cancer screenings, and Pap tests, screenings for and treating sexually transmitted diseases, HIV tests, family planning – and ultimately, the state will end up spending so much more money to treat whatever may develop that is preventable. And it's going to be low-income people, and it's not only going to be hurtful to them, but it's going to hurt the state of Texas."

Howard pointed particularly to the "maledominated Legislature" (79% of legislators are men). "I hate to sound sexist," she said, "but until we get more women in the Legislature ... I don't think we'll start to see the change happen." Naishtat was slightly more optimistic, saying that he expects a "backlash" against these cuts, as there was after one in 2003 cut roughly 240,000 children from the Children's Health Insurance Program – perhaps electing a few more progressive legislators. "I don't know how many it will be," Naishtat said, "but even if it's just five, or six, or 10, it's going to be enough to change some attitudes, and to make the members of the House who so adamantly imposed these harsh and draconian cuts a little more sensitive to these issues.'

Maybe even a little more, in actual fact, pro-life.

Away We Go

Who does Austin want to lead the way?

By now, most people who follow local politics know that former Council Member **Brigid Shea** launched her campaign for mayor this week in a somewhat courageous (or foolish, depending on one's view) attempt to unseat incumbent **Lee Leffingwell**, who is running for a second term in the May 12 election. For both candidates, the race is destined to be a difficult, punishing journey, but nonetheless informative, engaging, and fun, as political campaigns go.

The two candidates are onetime allies who in the past supported each other's council races – Leffingwell recalls voting for Shea in her 1993 run, and Shea backed Leffingwell's 2005 campaign to succeed former Council Member **Daryl Slusher**. Shea and Leffingwell have disagreed on several major issues since then, but these disagreements have usually carried a civil tone and taken place while they were sitting across the table from

across the table from each other. Nevertheless, the race has strong potential for ugliness, although both sides have committed to stay above the fray and to stick to the critical matters facing our beautiful, booming city.

"I look forward to talking about the serious issues facing our community," Leffingwell said in a statement. "I am ready to ask the voters of Austin to look at my record – a record of city hall reforms, of committing to renewable energy, and of creating jobs. And to look at my vision for Austin's future of urban rail, charter reforms, and protecting Austin's quality of life."

It's "the vision thing" that Shea says is lacking in Leffingwell's leadership. She believes her vision – which on paper seems similar to what Leffingwell laid out above – is sharper and more results-oriented. "I'm hoping that we can have a really honest and full

discussion about different priorities and different directions, which is what the citizens deserve. I'll be pointing out differences between Lee and myself ... how I would intend to do things differently, but I certainly hope we can keep it focused on the issues and not get into personalities."

Even before Shea officially announced Wednesday night, she had already rankled Leffingwell's staff and supporters with her declaration that the mayor had not taken an active role in responding to the school-closure crisis in the Austin Independent School District. Shea said Leffingwell hasn't sufficiently reached out to other local officials and business leaders across the state to fend off anticipated budget cuts in the next legislative session.

On the grassroots front,
Leffingwell has lost some ground
with neighborhood and environmental groups who

helped him earn victories in previous elections. The dissatisfaction took a turn for the worse over Leffingwell's support of Water Treatment Plant

No. 4, and the city's convoluted business dealings with the Formula One racing operation now taking physical shape in Southeast Austin.

Once it appeared that Leffingwell would not face a viable opponent this year, Shea began exploring challenging an incumbent with a healthy war chest – he raised nearly \$90,000 between last fall and early this year, with campaign-bundling assistance from developer lobbyists. By contrast, Shea had raised \$4,200 since naming a campaign treasurer in December.

"We've always said they have the money, but we have the votes," Shea noted, referring to a long line of progressive get-out-the-vote efforts that have turned back better-financed campaigns at the ballot box.

OUR WATER FUTURE

Shea says she is most particularly concerned about the direction the city is taking in areas of **affordability** and **water conservation**. "I've heard from people who are worried about costs going up, about the financial well-being of the city," she said. "We've made bad management decisions about spending money in certain areas, and I feel like we've done a terrible job of managing our water wisely. I want us to be the most water-wise city in the nation."

As things stand now, she said, "the city is in this weird position now of having to sell water in order to pay its bond debt on all the projects at the water utility. And they're having to continually raise rates to do that." Shea points to Leffingwell's lack of leadership on water conservation – including the reuse of treated water and repairing the city's network of leaking pipes – as one reason the utility is in a financial catch-22. "I even had this conversation with Lee," she says, "probably at least two years ago, because I was concerned about the city getting into big bond debt" with the construction of WTP4.

For the record, Shea said she's not hellbent on shutting down the construction of WTP4, as the council already considered that possibility last year and declined to take action, perhaps missing a strategic opportunity to rein in costs on the \$500,000 project. "I think we're stuck with it," she said. "I'll look to find savings where possible because I think we're spending too much money on it. We've got several layers of companies all looking over each other's shoulders on it – it's not a main focus for me, but it's an example of bad management.

"A priority for me," Shea continued, "is to have us be the most water-wise city in the nation. We have the smarts to do it. We have the willingness on the part of the community to do it, and we have an absolute necessity to do it – it's a resource that we have absolutely got to treat for the precious and scarce thing that it is."

On Jan. 11, George Friedman, founder and CEO of Stratfor, the Austin-based "geopolitical analysis" company, posted a report about the December "Anonymous" hack of the Stratfor website, its credit card records, and its email archives. Several of the company's servers were also destroyed, Friedman reported, in sabotage "clearly designed to silence us by destroying our records and the website." Friedman reports on what happened, the company's response, and its plans going forward. Of the stolen emails, he writes: "Obviously, we were not happy to see our emails taken. God knows what a hundred employees writing endless emails might say that is embarrassing, stupid or subject to misinterpretation. What will not appear is classified intelligence from corporations or governments. They may find, depending on what they took, that we have sources around the world, as you might expect."

On Jan. 22, a few Stratfor emails were posted and circulated on the Internet, and at least one - concerning Occupy Austin calls into question Friedman's assurance that Stratfor possesses no "classified intelligence from corporations or governments." The posting is actually two internal email strings among several Stratfor employees, one (dated Oct. 16, 2011) briefly discussing Occupy and similar movements, the other (Nov. 16-17) addressing a national "deep ecology" group called Deep Green Resistance.

The discussion itself is fairly unremarkable, even superficial. But the second email string specifically recounts (apparently verbatim) information gathered by Stratfor from a "new source" identified as a "Texas **DPS agent**" who reports he (or she) has been working "U/C" (undercover) at City Hall and has gathered information about Deep Green Resistance from "contacts" there - that is, other Occupiers who unwittingly told the agent about an appearance of local DGR folks at a Friday, Nov. 4, 2011, general assembly. Based on his reading of the book Deep Green Resistance and the national group's website, the agent is convinced that DGR is "nothing but ... eco-terror[ists]." Although the agent wasn't present on Nov. 4, he was later told that Occupy and the DGR folks had a falling out over who was sufficiently "radical." After "some conflict between regular Occupy people and Deep Green," he was told, "Deep Green picked up all their stuff and left during the night." The DGR folks are particularly worrisome, reports the agent: "When my Occupy people refer to them as 'stupid, crazy motherfuckers,' that bothers me, because these Occupy people will tolerate just about anything."

The Stratfor response seems not quite as credulous. "Watch Officer" Marc Lanthemann reports (after a couple of hours of Web research) that while calling national DGR "weird is an understatement," it seems the local group is "not nearly as radical." Based on its book and Web postings, Lanthemann briefly summarizes national DGR's ideology as "a mix of hardcore environmentalism, anarchism, radical feminism and the general notion that we need to go back [to] living sustainably like the american indians by blowing up every pipeline and cell tower on the planet." (That somewhat hyperbolic summary is reasonably accurate; those interested can read much more at www.deepgreenresistance.org.)

What is not in the Stratfor emails is any acknowledgment that it's a bit unusual for a private research firm to be gathering undercover intelligence - officially or unofficially - from a state trooper. Contacted by the Chronicle, neither Stratfor nor the Texas Department of Public Safety would confirm either the legitimacy of the emails or the

existence of the "Texas DPS agent" who apparently felt free to feed undercover "intelligence" to a private company. Stratfor's official position is not to comment (other than in its own publications) on anything concerning the Anonymous hacks; a spokesman would say only that Stratfor gathers information from "open and human sources" and digests that information when publishing its subscriber-based website on global politics.

And despite several attempts at prodding, DPS was even less forthcoming about whether its undercover agents might be infiltrating Occupy Austin, and more specifically whether it would be standard procedure – or even legal – for any such agents to pass their information on to a private research firm. A DPS spokesman described the alleged difficulty of investigating the email or determining whether an agent was assigned to Occupy, and based on their response, his superiors seemed utterly uninterested in finding out whether one of their own was leaking confidential information. In a statement that does not inspire confidence in the investigative abilities of the DPS, the agency issued a single sentence: "DPS cannot verify the authenticity of the information contained in the e-mail."

Sources within Occupy confirm that there was indeed an early November disagreement between local DGR and the Occupiers, primarily over whether a DGR manifesto had been promptly posted, as previously agreed, on the Occupy website - which drifted into broader disputes over which group was more "serious." As to surveillance, Kit O'Connell, Occupy's "Twitter magnet," said he wasn't present during the Nov. 4 assembly, but that after the Halloween overnight arrests, some Occupiers reported suspicions of one would-be activist who seemed to move behind police lines and point out additional people to arrest - and who hasn't been seen at City Hall since.

O'Connell said that while he couldn't speak for the whole group, in the wake of the Stratfor email publication: "People do seem shaken up a bit by this leak. Nobody's totally surprised that this is happening, but having direct proof of it changes the conversation from 'What if this is happening?' into 'Now we know this is happening."

Jim Harrington of the Texas Civil Rights Project, who's done some legal work for Occupy, noted that in the past this kind of police surveillance has led to agents fomenting trouble or illegal actions where there were none. "We know from history that it's not a big step [from undercover surveillance] to manipulating the movements to their own [the informants'] ends. This is the big danger. And why should cops be infiltrating, and relying on informants to be infiltrating, pure First Amendment activity?"

Stratfor's DPS source also reported telling "the locals" - presumably the Austin Police Department - about the DGR presence. An APD spokeswoman said the department does not comment on tactics and, asked about the emails, responded, "APD is not mentioned [in the emails], and for our department to comment on how things are handled in another law enforcement agency would be inappropriate."

O'Connell acknowledged that there is one reassuring aspect of the emails - the authors don't seem to know what they're talking about, particularly concerning Occupy. "Some of them are concerned that we're going to overthrow the government, and others are concerned with making fun of us as dirty hippies. I don't like the idea of being surveilled, personally but I'm less concerned when they seem to be so incompetent." - Michael Kina

End of the Road for AISD Exigency

Austin ISD's budget may still be in the red, but the threat of mass firings has dissipated. On Jan. 30, the board of trustees voted unanimously to end financial exigency - the state of emergency that allowed the district to fire roughly 8% of its staff last year (see "AISD's Next Step After Exigency?," March 4, 2011). Even though the district still expects a revenue shortfall next year, Superintendent **Meria Carstarphen** told trustees, "There will not need to be another reduction in force this school year in order to cover our budget." The driving force behind exigency was

nominally to allow Carstarphen to cut costs through layoffs, but it also allowed her to fire many long-term staff members and use the cash she freed up to restructure their respective departments and hire their replacements. With that restructuring complete, Carstarphen told the board that the district will pull cash out of its unexpended fund balances to cover the predicted shortfall of \$12.6 million. Of course, this leaves many unanswered questions, like how the administration managed to squirrel away an extra \$31.5 million in its fund balance since August 2010 while pleading poverty to the board. More pressingly, as trustee Robert Schneider asked Carstarphen, how long can the district use its savings to cover future shortfalls? According to district Chief Financial Officer Nicole Conley-Abram, this would be a one-off deal: If the board wants to avoid future cuts or give teachers a long-overdue pay raise, it will need to ask voters for a tax rollback election. - Richard Whittaker



In turn, Gingrich got campaign cash, funding to support him after being drummed out of office in disgrace in 1998, free rides on Adelson's corporate jet, and backing for his present run for the presidency. In the past, the biggest personal check he could've taken from his casino sugar daddy was \$5,000. After the Supreme's Citizens United edict, however, Adelson can go all in to push his willing servant into the White House.

So Newt got \$5 million from Adelson to buy his recent South Carolina victory and another \$5 million from Sheldon's wife, Miriam, to finance him in Florida. And next ... well, there's no telling, is there, Justice Kennedy, since you've legalized unlimited funds for the blatant corruption of America's elections?

April 3 Primary in Doubt

"If we have no agreed set of maps by February 6, 2012, there will be no April 3 primary." That was the stark warning on Jan. 27 from the San Antonio judicial panel to Texans in the ongoing redistricting trial. The panel's instructions were simple: The coalition of minority voting rights groups challenging the Legislature's most recent gerrymandering had 10 days to come to an interim redistricting agreement with the state; otherwise, the court will take charge of the process again, further delaying primary season. The challenge for the plaintiffs is to maintain a unified front, amid rumors over the weekend that the Mexican American Legislative Caucus and the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund were negotiating with the state to secure Hispanic opportunity districts without consideration for other minority groups. However, on Monday afternoon, League of United Latin American Citizens attorney Luis Vera Jr. told the Chronicle that all negotiations had "totally broken down" and that all the plaintiffs remained committed to waiting for the result of the federal preclearance trial. Since Washington, D.C., district judges only heard closing arguments in that case on Jan. 30, the Feb. 6 deadline seems unlikely, if not impossible. - Richard Whittaker

Herding Cats ... and Dogs ... in Austin & San Antonio

Last September, as Austin Animal Services was celebrating its sixth straight month with a 90% live-outcome rate, 80 miles down I-35 in San Antonio, that city's Animal Care Services department was dealing with its own, far grimmer, statistical reality. As San Antonio closed out fiscal year 2011, it was looking at a dismal 31% live-outcome rate, the kind of number that could drive even the most optimistic animal lover to despair.

In response, heads rolled. The city demoted shelter director Gary Hendel, who had been brought in two years earlier to lower San Antonio's soaring euthanasia rates, and replaced him with Joe Angelo, the assistant city budget director of innovation and reform. Though Angelo had no prior experience running an animal shelter, he had a plan to help bring the city's save rate up: private/ public partnerships.

"While coming up with a strategy to reduce our euthanasia rates, we researched the best practices of no-kill communities like Austin and Reno [Nev.], and the recurring theme with all of them was having a high-volume pet partner," said Angelo. San Antonio had little community involvement and almost no fostering and adoption infrastructure, no support systems like the kind Austin Animal

Services depends on to keep animals moving safely out of the shelter, so Angelo and his staff looked north for inspiration and saw the success Austin had partnering with rescue group Austin Pets Alive!. They decided the best way to start raising their numbers would be to get an Austin Pets Alive! of their own.

Services Officer On Jan. 19, San Antonio Pets Alive!, a **Abigail Smith** spin-off of the Austin original, and run (at least for now) by APA! Executive Director Ellen Jefferson, celebrated its birth by signing a lucrative partnership agreement with the city of San Antonio. Under the terms of the agreement, SAPA! will get up to \$200,000 for a period of up to one year to help Animal Care Services increase its live release rate by up to 4,000 animals. In other words, SAPA! will get \$50 a head for every animal it takes out of ACS, not to exceed 4,000 animals over the year. Add that \$200,000 to the \$120,000 APA! is getting from its Town Lake Animal Center contract, and the \$100,000 the group got for winning

the ASPCA adoption challenge in November, and fiscal year

2012 is turning out to be a nice one both for Jefferson and her team and for the animals they rescue.

All of which is presumably great for San Antonio and for the Pets Alive! brand - but where does it leave Austin?

APA! played a crucial role in getting Austin to "no-kill" status, and will need to continue playing a crucial role if the city is to be able to stay there. And with Austin Animal Services settling into a new shelter that houses nearly 60 fewer dogs than TLAC did - and with intake numbers rising all the time - it might just be that maintaining no-kill status is harder than achieving no-kill status. "It's safe to say we've been operating at or over capacity every day since we moved into the new shelter," says Chief Animal Services Officer Abigail Smith. "Some days we have some space in holding; some days we don't. We're full. We don't have the space to house an appropriate number of animals.

"Looking at the raw data, after two months, we're looking at increased intake of animals from the Eastside - more dogs, fewer adoptions and visitors. Things aren't happening quickly enough to keep the flow at a manageable level."

Over at TLAC, meanwhile, APA! is housing an average of 53 dogs a day, only six below its maximum allowed under the terms of the contract the group signed with the city. In

> addition, Smith says, the shelter is currently fostering 120 animals. Everywhere you look, the city is at capacity. Smith hopes people don't simply look at the shelter's sunny save rate – 92% in December – and think the hard work has already been done. "Because we're no-kill, people aren't seeing what's behind the scenes, which is we're struggling," she

To further complicate matters, APA!'s main Manchaca facility may not be theirs much longer. According to Jefferson, the landlord is most likely going to be selling the property in May, so the group has started looking for a new home. Jefferson wouldn't rule out TLAC as an option, though moving in would require an amendment to the current contract with the city - moreover, the city built that new Levander Loop shelter because TLAC was deemed to be unfit for long-term animal care.

So things could get very difficult if APA! either diminishes its work here to concentrate on San Antonio or, as some fear, SAPA! starts bringing animals rescued in San

Antonio to cages and homes in Austin, which has an established rescue infrastructure, but one that is already straining at the seams. Jefferson says she isn't concerned about San Antonio's currently bare-bones animal welfare community. "Austin didn't have any of this when we started either," she says. "We're in the process of getting fosters and adopters and volunteers signed up. People will start coming forward when they hear about it. The city is involved, and the community is engaged."

As for the concern that APA! might be less involved in Austin now that the group is branching out, Jefferson - who is currently splitting her time between Austin and San Antonio - says her group has set up "organizational safeguards" to ensure that doesn't happen. "We're still as committed as ever to keeping Austin no-kill." - Josh Rosenblatt

YMCA Has Designs on TLAC Site

Animal advocates and parks advocates alike were in alarm mode early this week as news broke that the city is in negotiations with the YMCA to give land and funding for a new aquatics center near the Y's Town Lake branch – possibly impinging on the tract formerly occupied by the Town Lake Animal Center, and now being used as a temporary shelter by Austin Pets Alive!.

The animal rights community had suspected the city all along of having ulterior motives in closing the TLAC, and some view this news as grim confirmation of those fears. Parks advocates, meanwhile, see it as another in a series of privatization initiatives coming out of the city **Parks and Recreation Department**, with the specific support of Mayor **Lee Leffingwell**. And once again, PARD appears to be trying to sideline the city's Parks and Recreation **Board**, which reportedly asked for a presentation on the plan before PARD and the Y went public on it, and were rebuffed.

Specifically, this newest initiative comes on the heels of PARD's unsuccessful attempts to privatize or repurpose the Austin and Dottie Jordan Recreation centers last fall, and the city's controversial deal to fund construction of a North Austin YMCA, instead of a long-awaited city rec center which area residents believed they would get from bond money approved in 2006. - Nick Barbaro

Barrera Killer Dead?

Austin Police say a likely suspect in the murder of Esme Barrera is dead.

At a Jan. 26 press conference, police said that 25-year-old James Loren Brown has been linked through DNA to a series of attacks on women - including one around 5am on New Year's Day in the 300 block of East 31st Street, which happened just hours after Barrera was killed in her King Street cottage a few blocks west. Brown has also been linked to four additional assaults in Central Austin – including three in July on South Congress and on Barton Springs Road, and a fourth in September at Comal and Haskell streets. He is now being investigated as a suspect in the attack on King Street and in Barrera's murder; there is a "considerable"

amount of investigative work yet to be completed before police can say definitively whether he was responsible for Barrera's murder, says APD.

ently committed suicide.

Police say Brown was found earlier this month in his home in the 3000 block of Guadalupe - not far from where Barrera was murdered just after 2:30am on Jan. 1. Brown was found dead by his roommate, having appar-

Another woman was attacked just steps from Barrera's home about a halfhour before the murder. That woman described her attacker to police, who generated a sketch that was widely dis-

tributed across Austin in the hopes that a suspect in the murder would be found. Police say that a detective and crime scene specialist noticed that a photo of Brown found in his home resembled the sketch of the suspect described by the

woman attacked before Barrera's murder on New Year's Dav.

Barrera was a well-liked fixture of the Austin music scene who worked with kids with special needs at Casis Elementary School and was studying for her teaching certificate. For more on her and the New Year's Day attacks, see "Excited About Life," Jan. 13.

Porn Busters Return!

It's been roughly two years since **Javier** Perez was released from federal prison, after serving out a nearly five-year sentence for possession of child pornography. Perez has always claimed he didn't send the child pornography that led to the federal investigation that put him in jail. And now the man who was the actual target of that investigation has himself been arrested in Austin and charged with recording an Internet video of a young girl being sexually assaulted. "It's so horrible," says Perez, who now lives and works with his family outside of Austin. "It's been a roller coaster of emotions." (For more on the case, see "Porn

Busters," Aug. 17, 2007.) Perez was arrested after FBI agents raided his home in June 2004. They'd targeted Perez based entirely on the fact that his name appeared on a bill for a **Time** Warner Cable Internet account. The investigators had gotten a tip from a woman in upstate New York that she'd received videos of young girls engaged in sexual activity from a man she'd been chatting with in a Yahoo! chat room, a man who was using the screen name "famcple." Contacted by the FBI. Yahoo! told investigators that "famcple" was the name used by a "Mr. Rob Ram."

As it turned out, Perez shared his Oak Hill home with two roommates, one of whom was named Robert Ramos. All three of the roommates' computers were hardwired into the Time Warner modem via ethernet lines. But when police raided Perez's home, they either weren't interested in searching Ramos' room and computers or they simply didn't make the connection between the two names. The feds eventually found images of what they said was child pornography on several computer discs among hundreds of stored discs that contained information that Perez, with a history of compulsive tendencies, had downloaded from the Internet without reviewing. (What

those images in fact might have been is unknown; any evidence deemed to depict child pornography is not available for public inspection.) Perez maintained that he never meant to download any pornography and says he never did any online chatting. Simply put, he said, the FBI targeted the wrong man and allowed their 2004 perpetrator to remain at large.

Now Ramos has been arrested in Austin and charged with child pornography and having solicited underage girls to send naked photos of themselves to him via a fake Facebook page he set up. In a statement to the FBI, Ramos admitted to solicit-

ing females on the social networking site but denied ever committing any child abuse. "I have never had sexual contact with a minor and I am not a threat to anyone," reads a transcript of the statement filed in an FBI affidavit with the federal court. "What I have done was stupid and not worth anything. I am very sorry and have made some terrible mistakes."

The fact that Ramos has been arrested for doing the same things he was allegedly doing back in 2004 is cold comfort to Perez, who

ultimately pleaded guilty to possession of child porn. He says it's "horrible" what Ramos has been doing, and that the FBI failed to realize it was Ramos who they were looking for back in 2004 when they could have stopped him. He said that at the time of the raid on Perez's home on Scenic Brook Drive, Ramos told Perez that he felt that "you took a bullet for me," Perez recalled this week.

Perez said he's spent nearly eight years trying to "figure out how to get this fixed" and how to clear his name, and he wonders now if there might be a chance at vindication. "I still feel very strongly that this was an illegal search" of his property and computer, he says. "I thought he'd never get caught." - Jordan Smith



Supremes Wink at Titty Tax

There will be no Lone Star strippers in D.C. after the U.S Supreme Court decided it will not review Texas' "pole tax." On Jan. 23 the court announced that it would not consider the latest challenge by the Texas Entertainment Association to the \$5 per customer surcharge on bars with nude dancing. However, the case is far from concluded. When District Court Judge Scott Jenkins initially ruled the tax unconstitutional almost four years ago (see "Topless Tax Terminated," April 4, 2008), he ruled only on its potential First Amendment violations. Neither he, nor the Texas Supreme Court that overturned his ruling, considered whether it flouts the Texas Constitution. TEA attorney Stewart Whitehead said the case now returns to Jenkins' court to handle those issues. However, there may be a new delay, since almost all the staff members who handled the original trial have left the Attorney General's Office. Once he knows who will be representing the state, Whitehead said, "We'll probably set up a status conference with Judge Jenkins to see where we go next." The surcharge itself has been a complete bust. Proponents, who argued it would aid the state's dramatically underfunded sexual assault programs, claimed it would raise \$40 million a year; it has actually produced a fraction of that, and none of it can be spent until the legal wrangling is complete, just in case the state loses and has to return that money to the businesses. The Destruction of **Texas Health Care**

The GOP crusade against Planned Parenthood is devastating basic care for Texas women

Carole Belver, executive director of Community Action Inc. of Central Texas, spent Tuesday, Jan. 24, closing up the CAI women's health clinic in Elgin. As she packed up supplies and prepared files to be moved to Lockhart, the closest of the group's two remaining clinics, "the phone was ringing off the wall," she says. Three staff members have been terminated, and hundreds of clients have been left wondering where they'll go to receive basic reproductive and preventative health care.

Belver doesn't know what to tell them. CAI, which until recently operated 13 clinics in medium- and small-sized communities in Central Texas, now has just two, in Lockhart and San Marcos. "It's horrible; it's just devastating," she says. "And there's really no place for these clients to go."

Indeed, CAI is among 12 women's health contractors operating 22 clinics statewide that have been completely defunded as a result of last year's April Fools' Day slashing by Texas lawmakers of the family-planning budget traditionally used to provide low-income and uninsured women with access to health services. As it stands, there remains just \$38 million of a roughly \$100 million biennial budget to provide these

vital health services screenings for cervical and breast cancers and for diabetes and hypertension, as well as access to birth control, among other preventative health services that together make up a "wellwoman checkup." Since 2005, this money - federal dollars passed back through the state to fund services has paid for health care for an average of 244,000 needy women a year; with the small pot that remains, just

\$19 million this year, the Department of State Health Services estimates that just 60,000 low-income women will be able to access basic health services in 2012.

Defunding Basic Care

Why lawmakers chose to decimate a budget that had been barely keeping pace with actual need for services - according to a 2008 Guttmacher Institute report, there are some 1.5 million women in need of reproductive health services in Texas - can be summed up in two words: Planned Parenthood. An increasingly aggressive political campaign against the nearly 100-year-old nonprofit is at the heart of the cuts. Conservative lawmakers - and their backers at Texas Right to Life and other antiabortion groups - were nearly giddy about the cuts last spring, proclaiming that slashing the budget would cripple Planned Parenthood, one of the state's largest providers of women's health care, and thereby bring an end to the "abortion industry."


Yet the federal funds in question do not cover abortion care, and thus none of Planned Parenthood's abortion services which, nationwide make up roughly 3% of its work - are paid for through the state's family-planning budget. Instead, what Republican lawmakers have done, with the express blessing of Gov. Rick Perry, is hurt Texas women, especially the women who most desperately need a health care safety net. "It was shocking; it was sort of unbelievable," says Paula Turicchi, senior vice president for women and infants' specialty health at Parkland Health & Hospital System in Dallas, the state's single largest provider of family planning services to uninsured women. "The bottom line is that the women who need services are the ones who suffer the consequences."

Moreover, compounding the outright cuts, lawmakers also approved a new fund-

ing matrix that first funds "federally qualified health centers" - one-stop medical clinics intended to provide the uninsured with a medical home (although a number of FQHCs across the state actually subcontract with smaller familyplanning providers, including Planned Parenthood clinics, in order to provide these services) - before funding other providers. Lawmakers arranged a three-tiered system for

funding women's health providers, with PP on the lowest rung and with the expectation that in fact there wouldn't be money left to fund any PP clinics. That outcome was assured - but with just \$19 million per year left to spend, there also hasn't been money left for many providers other than FQHCs, including veteran community providers.

According to the funding allocations released this month by DSHS, 12 contractors, operating 22 clinics statewide, have been completely defunded. Among those are not only a number of Planned Parenthood clinics - including Austin's Downtown clinic on East Seventh Street - but also other stand-alone family-planning clinics and

venerable community health clinics, such as Austin's People's Community Clinic and El Buen Samaritano Episcopal Mission.

The severe funding cuts and tiered system mean that great swaths of Texas may be left without local providers. CAI, a contractor with the state for more than 40 years, had been receiving more than \$750,000 per year to deliver women's health care to clients across Central Texas. Now that they've been defunded - along with the other Central Texas providers - there remains just one provider, CommUnityCare, to serve the majority of Central Texas women. "I'm just wringing my hands; it's just horrible," says Belver. State lawmakers "have successfully torn down an infrastructure that took so many years to build," she continued. "There's no talking sense to these people. They've got it 'all figured out,' and yet they haven't figured out that this is going to be devastating - and by the time they do, it will be too late.

Bleak Outcomes

And the already bleak landscape for women's health care in Texas is likely going to get even worse, unless state officials with the Health and Human Services Commission can successfully negotiate with the federal government's Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services to allow for the renewal of the successful Women's Health Program, a Medicaid-waiver program that provides women's health care services to clients who would not otherwise be eligible for Medicaid unless pregnant. In 2011, that program served more than 184,000 women in addition to the 215,442 unique clients served last year with the traditional family-planning budget. However, the future of the program is in jeopardy, after Sen. Robert Deuell, R-Greenville, pushed HHSC to redefine who can provide services under the WHP - a move crafted, again, to cut Planned Parenthood from funding. As with the traditional family-planning budget, PP is a major player in the WHP; in 2008, it was the WHP's largest provider. And though

Texas might like to cut PP out of the loop, the feds aren't as amenable; Medicaid forbids states from discriminating against qualified providers. To women's health advocates, the attempt to exclude PP does just that - which will likely mean the program will disappear, bringing the number of women left without health care in 2012 ever-closer to the half-million mark. "This is so much more than just [hurting] Planned Parenthood," says Sarah Wheat, co-interim CEO of Planned Parenthood of the Texas Capital Region. "And it's so depressing."

As a result of all these drastic policies, health care advocates say the state is likely to see more providers close and many more women left without basic health care. That outcome will also increase the number of unplanned, Medicaid-paid births; the number of cancers detected in later stages of disease; and, inevitably, the number of abortions. "The obvious list is undetected cancers, higher rates of sexually transmitted diseases, unwanted pregnancies that end up in more Medicaid-paid births, more children enrolled in CHIP [the Children's Health Insurance Program] and more needing Head Start and other educational programs," says Fran Hagerty, CEO of the Women's Health and Family Planning Association of Texas. "All of the social services and educational programs that we can't afford now, we'll be taxing more."

While cuts to the state's budget for women's health is alarming providers across the state, Perry, on the presidential campaign trail, boasted to Politico about the state's targeting of PP: "I was really proud to be able to sign legislation that we worked on with our Legislature to defund Planned Parenthood in the state of Texas," he said. "There are 12 abortion clinics that aren't open in the state of Texas today because our members of the Legislature had the courage, the wisdom to do that."

Perry's bragging may please his hardcore conservative base - but it's false. Eleven Planned Parenthood clinics across the state

have indeed folded operations because of the budget cuts – including six near the Mexican border, where the need is great and there are few other options for care – but none of those clinics actually provided abortion care. Instead, those clinics combined provided health exams to 20,565 clients, including 13,184 screenings for cervical cancer; 14,163 screenings for breast cancer; and 33,974 screenings and treatment for sexually transmitted infections, according to Wheat. Moreover, the budget cuts have forced other, smaller providers – e.g., CAI – to shutter their operations.

Bringing It Home

As a result of the cuts, the statewide women's health care provider base is rapidly shrinking. In 2011, the state had 73 contractors operating clinics statewide; in 2012, there are just 41. In Austin, no provider has actually closed, even though just one of the county's four contractors has received any funding for 2012. People's Community Clinic, El Buen Samaritano, and the Downtown PP clinic which had been a state contractor for 40 years - were all defunded, for a combined loss of just over \$1.4 million in funds. The only remaining contractorinTravisCountyisCommUnityCare, which operates 22 clinics countywide; in 2011, the FQHC served 5,193 family-planning While the allocation for patients. CommUnityCare was in-creased slightly for 2012 - to \$477,642 from \$413,619 in 2011 that's hardly a windfall, especially when you consider that those are the only funds allocated to a growing metropolitan region in which many thousands of women need services.

But comparatively speaking, Austin may not be in as bad a shape as other regions - particularly those along the Mexican border and in broad swaths of West Texas. Thanks to Central Health, women in Austin may be less likely to lose services completely. Knowing that the axe was going to fall on the state's family-planning budget, the hospital district set out to rework a series of contracts with each of the area's big providers - including the three cut from state funds - in order to provide a backup plan once other sources of funding dry up. For example, Planned Parenthood has a \$400,000 contract with the district, which it hopes will help it keep serving its clients in need at the Downtown clinic. That's less money than the clinic had received from the state, and because the funds come from local tax dollars, it also means that women from outside Travis County will be unable to access services. (Funds from the state are for all women, so, for example, a woman from San Marcos could potentially be seen in Austin for care.)

Without state funds, there are few options for women outside Austin. Such is the headache for Belver's CAI; under the current statewide map, there are no contractors in Hays County—in fact, CommUnity Care

is the only provider between Round Rock and San Antonio. And it's highly unlikely that it'll be able to pick up all of the slack created by the drastic cuts. They're certainly going to try, says Leslee Froehlich, chief operating officer for CommUnityCare. "We're here to make sure that women have access to these services. We're pleased the state gave us additional funds to do that with." She says the provider has opened "additional capacity" to accommodate new clients and a single phone number for patients to call to schedule services.

The Dismal Prospects

Beyond Travis County, the effects are more disheartening. Consider Parkland Hospital in Dallas, the state's single largest provider of women's health and family-planning services. One in every 250 births nationwide is delivered at Parkland, which tallies more than 1 million patient visits per year. For family planning, it has been just as big a powerhouse. In 2010, the hospital received almost \$6.9 million to provide health care for nearly 33,000 women; last year, with all sources of funding

- including the state family-planning budget (from which it got \$6.6 million) and WHP funds - the hospital saw more than 38,000 clients and averted 6,600 unplanned pregnancies. This year, the hospital - which serves a population in which more than 42% live below the poverty line and more than 30% are without health insurance – got just \$1.4 million in state women's health funds. It has gone from nine funded clinics to just two, says Turicchi, and the hospital estimates this year it will be able to serve just 6,000 women. "It's very heartbreaking," she says. "Just because [certain lawmakers] have a particular agenda related to a particular provider," everyone will end up being hurt. "That was lost in the whole political process."

It may well get worse - especially for providers like Parkland, which also delivers thousands of babies, a majority paid for in one way or another by Medicaid. Roughly 56% of all Texas births are paid for by Medicaid, which is a far larger aspect of the state's budget than is family planning; in 2009 alone, the state paid out \$2.7 billion to cover Medicaid births (most of that coming from federal funds). The Women's Health Program was designed, in part, to combat these high costs. The Medicaid-waiver program is a great deal for Texas: For every \$1 in state funding, the

feds provide \$9. In 2009, according to Texas' Health and Human Services Commission, the program saved the state \$46 million and averted 10,300 Medicaid births. In 2010, the WHP served 183,537 women.

But it looks now like the program will soon be killed, thanks entirely to political forces that wish to see Planned Parenthood excluded from participation. Although the initial program contained a provision to exclude abortion providers, the provision was never used as a wedge to exclude PP. Indeed, under federal law, states are not allowed to exclude an otherwise qualified provider from participation based, in this case, on the state's disapproval of one legally protected aspect of its business. At the behest of Deuell, however, the state has redefined the word "affiliate" in order to exclude PP from WHP participation. The new definition would exclude from the WHP any provider in any way affiliated with an abortion provider. Thus, all PP clinics would be excluded

as the Chronicle previously reported, were purflatly inaccurate "medical" information and \$1,500 for the toll-free hotline. In 2011, the TPCN hotline fielded a total of 32 calls - 32 - from across the entire state. In all, TPCN's CPC contractors served 16,215 clients last year (although TPCN reported that more than 82,000 people "visited" one of its contracted centers) at a cost of just more than \$3.1 million - all this without providing any actual medical services. The bulk of that money was spent on "counseling" at a cost of roughly \$1.05 per minute, for a total of roughly \$2.3 million. (Some providers, including several Catholic charity organizations, employ master's-level counselors, but not all contractors do. Indeed, the state does not require that the CPCs employ any licensed professionals, though TPCN does require that staff "have received comprehensive pregnancy counseling/mentoring skills orientation and training.") Another \$88,000 paid for "referral" time - including referrals to health care services and for other government programs - and roughly \$470,000 went to reimburse the centers for parenting classes.

So, while the infrastructure for actual medical services for underserved women in Texas is crumbling into ruins, the pot of money made available by the Legislature for "childbirth promotion" (or more accurately, anti-abortion propaganda) continues to grow.

- even though many don't provide any abortion care - simply because they're all members of the same umbrella nonprofit.

The prevailing wisdom has been that this new definition would not meet federal approval, and thus far it has not - thereby threatening the continuation of the program in Texas. In December, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (Centers for Medicaid & Medicaid Services) wrote a letter to Texas saying it would not approve continuing the program so long as it includes an "order to restrict beneficiary choice of family planning providers." The feds left open the possibility that some compromise could be achieved, but Perry has publicly gone out of his way to shut that door. During his ill-fated presidential campaign, he denounced what he called the "pro-abortion" Obama administration for meddling in Texas' determination to protect life by excluding PP. That stance, advocates say, has diminished any bargaining room there might have been for HHSC to negotiate a compromise.

The result, they believe, is that nearly 200,000 additional women will likely be cut from services, leading to a precipitous increase in Medicaid-paid births. "I lay this squarely in [Perry's] lap," says Hagerty, CEO of the Women's Health and Family Planning Association of Texas, which represents a number of women's health providers that seek to ensure access to quality reproductive health services for all Texas women. "Politically, [HHSC] has been put in an impossible situation. [Texas is] writing a [waiver] application that we know violates federal law." And because of that, the Women's Health Program seems doomed. "It doesn't look good because I don't see any leeway: the politics of Texas haven't given [HHSC] any leeway in negotiations with CMS," she said. Under the law, the federal government "can't say, 'Oh! It's Planned Parenthood; well, go ahead [and cut them out].' Or, 'Oh! It's Texas; you just go ahead [and discriminate]. But that's what Texas is asking them to do - and Texas knows it."

The cost of losing the WHP is huge, especially to providers like Parkland. Because the hospital also handles Medicaid births, it understands well the advantage of having a productive family-planning program, which costs thousands less than a Medicaid birth. And because the state has continuously reduced its Medicaid reimbursement rates, the increase in births likely if the WHP goes away will create an even greater strain on an already underfunded health care system. The state "keeps asking us to do more with less," says Turicchi. "So, if family planning goes, we'll see additional births. If family planning goes, and we don't pay for [preventative health services] we're going to turn around and have to pay it in Medicaid, and it's going to be more expensive."

A World Turned Upside Down

Although he knows the state's familyplanning budget has been a political football over the years, Victor Azíos, executive director of El Buen Samaritano Episcopal Mission, was nonetheless surprised when lawmakers voted to strip the budget outright last year. "My greatest surprise was how the legislators voted. It was about as short-sighted as it comes. I don't think it was any force of logic or any rational move," he says. "I think that what they forget is what the federal government and the state government call 'family planning' is really women's health." Like other local providers and women's health advocates, Azíos knows that even if there were more money, there would remain large unmet needs for these same services. Cutting the health care budget, whatever the ostensible motive, does nothing to help ensure that we have planned, happy, and healthy families.

"I think it's going to be one of those situations where patients who need services are going to bombard the remaining providers," says Parkland's Turicchi. Indeed, says Hagerty, even if state lawmakers discover they've made a grave mistake, it may be too late to fix in 2013. "The state pulled the rug out from under [women's health providers]. That's true for all these people. They're trying to make magic out of dust," says Hagerty. "They do amazing work. The organizations are unique to their counties. These are mostly women who care about women deeply, and it's all getting ripped to shreds."

Among the providers now hanging on by a thread is Belver's Community Action Inc. And if the WHP is killed, she's certain she'll have to close the two remaining clinics in what was once a multicounty network of women's health care providers. "Everything is upside down and backwards," says Belver. "I used to think we would prevail because we're doing the right thing. How could you in your right mind think [that cutting women's health] is the right thing? But that's the thing, they're not in their right minds."





Les Ballets Trockadero de Monte Carlo

A PEEK BENEATH THE TUTU FROM AUSTIN'S MIKE MCKINLEY

On Feb. 7, Austin balletomanes will meet their match. It appears that no one loves ballet more than the drag ballerinas of Les Ballets Trockadero de Monte Carlo, the 40-year-old New Yorkbased parody ballet company, which will give one performance at the Long Center. In 1974, dance critic Arlene Croce perceived an affinity for "brokendown, touring-trunk, desperate-laststand ballet" as the epicenter of the troupe's success. Since then, the repertoire has acquired parodies of neoclassical and modern dance, but the Trocks remain faithful to their stalwart and hilarious interpretations of classics like Swan Lake and Pas de Quatre, which pay homage to the originals while camping up the melodrama and diva-ism that ballet-lovers love (and others love to hate).

One balletomane who will be in the audience is Mike McKinley, who danced with the Trocks for more than a decade. McKinley's passion for and knowledge about the art are to be reckoned with, despite his unconventional education and trajectory. A native Austinite, McKinley began his artistic life as a talented member of the Austin High orchestra. Later, as a drama student at the University of Texas, he answered a call-board notice for men with "any acrobatic or gymnastics experience." Though he had no dance background, McKinley had arched feet and a good jump, and he soon found himself training with famed dancer Igor Youskevitch in the style of the old Russian school, practicing pirouettes and double tours as well as knocking back vodka shots while Youskevitch told of his days with the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo.

After graduation, McKinley killed time shimmying among tables at the Country Dinner Playhouse until he was spotted in class by the Trocks' drill-sergeant ballet mistress and her charge of tour-weary, hungover, and at times lascivious New Yorkers, during a tour stop in 1978. When the company needed a replacement months later, McKinley, who had never seen a fulllength classical ballet, was called to New York to spend entire workweeks rehearsing parodies of Swan Lake and Don Quixote. Feet calloused over, imperial choreography ingrained, McKinley took the stage and metamorphosed into the perky, high-jumping ballerina Tatiana Youbetchabootskaya (and, in male roles - all Trocks play both - a danseur called Igor Teupleze). He performed with the Trocks until 1991 (with a two-year break in the early Eighties), when he realized, before a fanatic Japanese audience, that Youbetchabootskaya's once airy pas de chat had begun to deflate.

Having never adjusted to life in New York, McKinley returned to Austin and UT, earning a degree in film studies and accepting a staff position at the university, where he works today. Now 57, he's at work on a memoir, Blood and Satin: Confessions of a Drag Ballerina, and he graciously let me read the first few chapters. Aside from documenting, from a unique perspective, the dance boom of the late Seventies and subsequent terrible losses to AIDS (McKinley counts two of his dearest friends among them), the manuscript refers to a "vortex of tulle, vodka, and rosin" that the Trocks inhabited during that period. I asked McKinley whether this vortex had something to do with the obsession with old ballet.

The diva-ballerina personae and real identities merged, he says. "The management at the time seemed to be

under the illusion - or delusion - that we were really a Russian ballet company. And they loved to sit, like a bunch of Russians around a table, drinking into the wee hours, and talk as if we really were a company of exiled Russian ballet dancers who had escaped a revolution. And even though we did not wear diamonds - we wore rhinestones there was enough of the old world lying in shrinking puddles around us that we could really sort of believe that we were carrying the flame, if nothing else. And that is the vortex of rosin, tulle, and vodka, where you really start to believe that you're a Russian ballerina."

It's no wonder that assimilating your identity with an impossibility has permanent and painful effects; McKinley struggled with alcoholism after retiring from dancing and hasn't had a drink in 12 years. But for him, "being a dancer is the most wonderful thing in the world, because once you're a dancer, vou're always a dancer" - with or without the rhinestones. Jonelle Seitz

Moontower Comedy and Oddity Festival

IN AUSTIN'S NEWEST FESTIVAL. STAND-UP FINALLY GETS TOP BILLING

It isn't that stand-up gets no love from Austin's festival scene. Comedy and the jokers who make it have become an increasingly prominent part of a pair of the biggest music fests in town, South by Southwest and Fun Fun, not to mention having a strong presence in our largest comedy fest, Out of Bounds. But no matter how deeply stand-up may be appreciated by other local festivals, it's always been the feature, never the headliner.

That changed last week with the announcement of the latest in Austin's nonstop stream of festivals: the Moontower Comedy and Oddity Festival. This four-day event, coming your way April 25-28, promises more than 60 comedians at a dozen venues, and while improv and sketch will most certainly be represented, stand-up is the star of the show. The stillreigning king of the conceptual punch line, Steven Wright, is among the marquee names trumpeted for the inaugural fest, along with empress of anxiety Maria Bamford, stand-up mage the Amazing Johnathan, and this guy whose day job at NBC might have eclipsed his stand-up roots, manic pop-culture

> machine Aziz Ansari (Parks and Recreation). And that's only the tip of the stand-up iceberg, with locals Matt Bearden and John Ramsey as well as onetime locals Chris Trew and Brendon Walsh among the two dozen acts confirmed by the big rollout at the Paramount Theatre last week, Saturday Night Live head writer/ Weekend Update anchor Seth Meyers may have taken pride of place in virtually every report of the Moontower guest lineup on Jan. 25, but the bulk of the list makes it clear that top billing goes to stand-up.

The Austin Theatre Alliance. better known as the parent

organization for the Paramount Theatre and State Theatre (which I still can't bring myself to call Paramount at the Stateside) is the mastermind behind this ambitious new festival, which ATA Executive Director Jim Ritts says he sees becoming one of the two most important comedy festivals in North America in just three years. Certainly the ATA's strong track record with stand-up in recent years - with the Paramount being the site of several Comedy Central specials (Jim Gaffigan, Demetri Martin, Nick Swardson, Bill Engvall) positions it well with the form, but a better indicator of Moontower's long-term growth may be its sponsoring partners: Cap City Comedy Club (also a presenting venue, not surprisingly); the Adam McKay-Will Ferrell video website Funny or Die (which will program screenings at the State throughout the fest); satirical newspaper The Onion; the New Movement's Hell Yes Fest (which will now piggyback on Moontower); Esquire magazine; and a host of businesses that can provide invaluable support services, from public relations to IT to booze.

Badges, which range from the four-day standard pass at \$99 to the VIP deluxe number at \$799, went on sale Feb. 1. For more information, visit www.moontowercomedyfestival.com or festival blog site www.comedymoontower.com. - Robert Faires

'Don't Go in the House'

Sometimes the best theatre isn't very, well, theatre-y. No dance numbers, no special effects, no cast of costumed characters invigorating a painstakingly constructed set. Maybe nothing more than a bit of audio-visual enhancement providing context for a single actor speaking on a plain stage. Problem is, the written material that's spoken - the script - has to be pretty damned good to succeed in such a minimal environment. Which is why the Dirigo Group's Don't Go in the House succeeds: not much more enjoyable writing on an Austin stage, ever, than a series of insightful, pop-culture-infused monologues by Lowell Bartholomee. From the snarky comedy of "Fear Itself," an over-the-top homesecurity sales pitch performed by the playwright, to "Dawn of the Drowsy," a look at the job-hunting travails of an apocalypseobsessed woman portrayed by Ellie McBride, to the childhood-memoir-cumfilm-critique "They're Coming To Get You!." brought wonderfully to life by Robert S. Fisher, this show packs a triple megaton of power and cleverness into its existence. The only thing that could make it better, perhaps, is if the middle of the show featured a brief, palate-cleansing break from the Bartholomeeness - Dan Dietz's short and unsettling Heideman Award-winner called "Lobster Boy," say, given perfect voice by the Chronicle's own Robert Faires. Oh, look, you lucky theatregoer: It does. - Wayne Alan Brenner

'Drawing a Paycheck'

Annie La Ganga always knows what I need. I show up to review Drawing a Paycheck without a pen and hallelujah, Annie has carefully rubber-banded stubby pencils to the programs, which ask silly questions about arts & crafts and terrible business ideas.

Drawing a Paycheck is La Ganga's ode to the creative, multitalented Austinites who have hit middle age and still don't know how they're going to earn a living when they grow up. But the show is also a psychological experiment of sorts. By fusing her idiosyncratic improvisational storytelling with visual art, La Ganga hopes to transform her turbulent relationship with making money.

The self-designated "craft hag" reflects on two decades of a misguided "You can sell that!" art business model, sharing her failures and successes with characteristic exuberance. As she talks, La Ganga draws portraits of audience members and has us draw one another. "I wanted to show off," she giggles. "I'm a real artist!" I must admit that La Ganga's pretty good with a pencil.

I secretly hope La Ganga never gets a real job with a paycheck. I hope she keeps doing what she's doing because it is a joy to watch an artist transfixed by the beauty in this world. - Jillian Owens

'Akimbo Bubble Scuttle Ruckus'

The latest project that improv group Da Foundry has forged is exactly what it sounds like: a nonsensical, irrelevant hullabaloo. In Akimbo Bubble Scuttle Ruckus, playwright Topping Haggerty strings together a mess of short sketches that, as we learn in the end, are all strangely linked. But you'll have to see the show to learn how Haggerty and her co-directors Susannah Raulino and Brandon Paul Salinas connect zombies in rehab, an equivocating evil villain, a woman out to dinner with 47 dates, and an American who aspires to become a Brit, among other oddball characters.

Though the spirited ensemble had energy to spare, some of the sketches fell flat, perhaps a consequence of a small Sunday evening house. Still, after the performance I found myself standing in mental akimbo that is, with hands on hips - trying to make heads or tails of the fairly uninspiring ruckus I'd just seen.


That's not to say that Akimbo Bubble didn't have its moments - there were glimmers of hilarity, particularly a sketch in which a horde of aggressive puppets murder their human handlers. I think perhaps, as David Rosenbaum crooned in the final scene, I just wasn't drunk enough to get it.

'Southern Fried Chickie'

Larry the Cable Guy has met his match in a busty, blond Tupelo, Mississippi, princess. In her entertaining one-woman show Southern Fried Chickie, Christy McBrayer proves that she's become everything her daddy wanted her to be: a strong, beautiful woman who knows as much as any man and can still drink him under the table. She's even got the unholy white trash - excuse me, debris blanc - trio of Jim Beam, PBR, and a Tab chaser ready to go.

Transforming with ease into 10 different Southern chickies before a delighted audience, McBrayer narrates funny, poignant, and sometimes unsettling conversations with family and friends



Though Southern Fried Chickie might ring true for Southerners, Yanks may wrinkle their noses at its playful treatment of domestic abuse and racism. But to lighten things up, a charming "redneck Greek chorus" accompanies McBrayer, strumming everything from Johnny Cash to Alison Krauss to Poison. The only thing missing is "Freebird."

'Holier Than Thou'

If the Second Coming were to occur in 2012 America, how else would we determine who he or she is than with a reality television competition? That's the hook of Holier Than Thou, which features seven performers (both onstage and via giant video talking heads) offering an oral history of their attempt to win the powers of the Messiah for a week.

There are some limitations inherent to an oral history, but director Bethany Perkins does a fine job of building chemistry among her actors and mitigating the fact that the "show vs. tell" dynamic is skewed so heavily toward the latter that the actors only look at each other one time during the entire play. Kacy Todd, particularly, impresses as she carries the piece's emotional climax via monologue - always a challenge.

Holier Than Thou struggles when the details of its competition get confusing - as on any good reality show, everybody's got challenges to perform, but it's not always clear exactly what's happening - but it's a play that aims high to address heady theological and cultural themes in a script by Bastion Carboni that also features satisfyingly immature jokes about Jesus and ballpunching. That makes for a lot of moving parts for a play where most of the actors don't even leave their chairs, and that sort of ambition is satisfying to watch. - Dan Solomon

'The Crapstall Street Boys'

Here's a Long Fringe show that comes in two parts: first, a minicircus, and next, a puppet play.

Circus Chickendog gave about 15 minutes of lovely, innocent circus entertainment; what it lacks in expensive

three-ring pizzazz it makes up for in simple fun.

Then Trouble Puppet Theater Company presented its newest creation, a dark and sad story about a lonely boy who believes his name is "You Lad" for want of being called anything else. You Lad's parents sell him to a factory so they can get money to buy protection from the monsters roaming their town. Once in the factory, You Lad discovers the sad secret behind the monster invasion.

Steve Moore narrates the story, and one of the puppeteers carries a camera amidst the action. An upstage screen shows what the camera sees, providing a different and more intimate view of the story. The technology isn't quite there yet - the feed was inconsistent - but the concept is interesting. As a finished show, it's a little rough, but taken as a workshop production, The Crapstall Street Boys is fascinating and worth seeing as an exploration of a new direction in the company's work. One of Trouble Puppet's strengths is harnessing good talent and seeing where it can take them. The Crapstall Street Boys fortunately follows this trend. – Elizabeth Cobbe

The Alien Baby Play is a weird little play, but it's a good one. Bethany (Kathleen Fletcher) plays a 15-month-pregnant lady who's invited an audience for the arrival of her extraterrestrial offspring.

She's a nervous personality anyway, and given the circumstances, her regular tics and twitches have now graduated into some full-on crazies. She is terrified of what will soon emerge from her body: A monster? An alien? A child who wants to be loved? She endures this state with an endearing wryness and confusion.

It's thanks to Fletcher that the show succeeds; she plays both the hysteria and the humor, and she engages the audience as a second character in the play, making whatever it brings into part of her story. One might call it nimble: the ability to play a role so thoroughly that the unexpected only feeds a performance.

The script from Nicholas Walker Herbert is puzzling but clever. Gary Jaffe's direction is great, based on the strength of Fletcher's work. This Tutto Theatre Company show provides an evening of goofy, quirky entertainment.

Wicked



Oz was an adolescent fascination of mine. I begged for ruby slippers at age 4, sang "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" at 9, synched Pink Floyd to the classic film at 13, and obsessed over the Broadway musical Wicked at 15.

L. Frank Baum's turn-ofthe-century tale of brains, heart, and courage has

worked its way into our national psyche, surfacing nowhere as spectacularly as in Wicked, a reimagining that chronicles the pre-Dorothy friendship of the witches of Oz. If you're unfamiliar with this 2003 adaptation, you haven't been paying attention; with music by Stephen Schwartz and a book by Winnie Holzman, Wicked has found that there's no place like pop culture. Its soundtrack has sold more than 2 million copies, and the original cast's leading witches Kristin Chenoweth (Glinda) and Idina Menzel (Elphaba, or the Wicked Witch of the West) have soaked up prime-time coverage on Fox's popular television series Glee.

The second national tour of the show comes with the bells and whistles you'd see on the Great White Way, especially fabulous. flamboyant costumes by Susan Hilferty, a stunning, ever-ticking, clock-themed set by Eugene Lee, and lurid lighting by Kenneth Posner. The touring cast manages to inch out of the original cast's shadows; Tiffany Haas plays Glinda with a remarkable emotional

range, and Anne Brummel gives Elphaba a refreshing femininity. Haas and Brummel have powerful onstage chemistry, charming the audience with physical comedy and an exceptionally good vocal blend. The ensemble lends support with an airtight performance, though Catherine Charlebois as Elphaba's sister Nessarose (the slipper-wearing witch Dorothy lands on) and Dan Pacheco as her munchkin beau Boq steal the stage in the second act. I think it's safe to say that the euphoric, largely female audience packed into Bass Concert Hall last Thursday night loved every wonderous minute of the performance.

Though I initially felt pretty angsty about revisiting my Oz phase, I was surprised to find myself on the edge of my seat, noticing a deep political dimension I hadn't considered seriously before. In Wicked, the portly, grey-haired Wizard of Oz (Don Amendolia) is a not-so-wonderful politician who has become so hooked on power that he fabricates a common enemy to rally fearful Ozians behind him. "The truth is not a thing of fact or reason," he chortles. "The truth is just what everyone agrees on." Before you dismiss Wicked, keep in mind that this musical is more than just smoke and mirrors. For me, this election-year tour packed an extra punch. - Jillian Owens

In last week's Arts section, I spoke with Next to Normal's Meredith McCall and Lucia di Lammermoor's Lyubov Petrova about how each made interpretive decisions playing women with mental problems in light of their respective productions' musical scores. Each intriguing insight they provided further piqued my interest to observe their interpretive work onstage. I'm looking forward to seeing McCall this month during her Zach Theatre run and had the pleasure of catching Petrova in action last weekend as the title role in the Austin Lyric Opera production of Donizetti's tragic tale.


With its premise somewhat adapted from a novel by Walter Scott, Lucia unfolds in Scotland during the Glorious Revolution of the late 17th century. In a plot brimming with overtones of Romeo and Juliet, Protestant Lucia had fallen deeply - one might say madly, even - in love with Edgardo, her brother's Catholic enemy. Deception ensues, and Lucia is

forced to marry Lord Arturo. The nuptials don't last long, though; just minutes after their wedding ceremony, Lucia returns to her own reception with dagger in hand, Arturo's blood spattered across her gown. She's killed him in an onset of insanity. and the "mad scene" that ensues is likely the most famed of the operatic canon.

When Petrova and I discussed her interpretation of this incredibly complex and challenging scene, she observed that "the most interesting twist in the story is that only in that madness does [Lucia] find her happiness." Indeed, it was the intense palpability of this sentiment in Petrova's performance of "II dolce suono" that brought the aria to life in such a riveting way. The Russian soprano's vocal abilities are technically superb (one could hear various iterations of whispered "wows" among audience members throughout the evening as she executed especially impressive arpeggiated passages and messa di voce inflections). But what lies behind Petrova's vocal fireworks is perhaps even more impressive: her nuanced attention to how each choice she makes furthers the arc of her role. Action (as in the driving force behind "acting") is not always the first aspect of an operatic performance to spring to mind. Yet Petrova is able to couple the best of both worlds: a keen sense of her character's objectives and tactics alongside the technical rigor to connect these actions to the complicated vocal passages Donizetti has laid before her.

Though perhaps not as engaging on the whole as ALO's season opener, The Magic Flute, this Lucia is carried admirably by Petrova, ensuring that the production's riveting moments are strung together in ways that lead to an ultimately satisfying experience by the time the grand drape falls. She exemplifies the concept of the "title role": that MVP who, when all is said and done, is ultimately responsible for shouldering the burden of the work and shepherding her company to a successful result. And she does it all with nearly maddening precision. Adam Roberts

We had a good laugh over that, and an even bigger laugh when my old friend, attorney Nathaniel Chapin, (whom I think is the best-dressed man in town) came up to us and said, "You look like a cross between Truman Capote and Michael Jackson with a touch of Lagerfeld." Now there's a man who is fashion-conscious. Thank you, Margaret Shaw, for inviting me again and again.

The 10-Day Juice Cleanse Challenge

I first met Matt Shook, owner of JuiceLand and partner at Juicebox & Soup Peddler, in the summer of 2008 while he served fresh-pressed juice cocktails out of a tiki hut at the Belmont (see "Four Cutting-Edge Cocktails," July 11, 2008). I've patronized his shops since, and in October, I stopped by to ask about the split between Daily Juice and JuiceLand. "It was kind of like hitting the 'refresh' button," he said, adding that JuiceLand locations would focus on producing bulk cleanses. He went on to explain all the benefits of cleansing the body with a juice fast and said he'd love to get my perspective as a "food person." He was so enthusiastic that I agreed on the spot (I have never met anyone whose last name fits their personality so well.) I must confess that I really had my doubts. I couldn't imagine myself going without food or wine for 10 days. But I rarely shy away from a challenge.

The staff at JuiceLand doesn't offer guidance on cleanses ("People can consult with a nutritionist or dietitian if they want," he said), but they certainly offer support. The website features a section allowing customers to pick from a variety of custom cleanse packages, pay online, and pick up their orders. Since I was a total novice and Shook saw my participation as his "special experiment," he gave me some pointers. My daily diet would consist of a half-gallon of Love Cleanse – an emerald-green elixir of coconut water, cucumber, celery, parsley, spinach, and kale - plus three to four selections of juices for flavor variety. I stuck mainly with a rotation of the tangy and savory Ninja Bachelor Party (pineapple, jalapeño, celery, kale, spinach, parsley, and salt); the Thai-salad-in-a-glass Tree of Life (carrot, turmeric, coconut, ginger, lime, cayenne, and beet); the creamy and filling Tri-Pinnacle (coconut, avocado, spinach, and kale); and the cleverly named Xtra Holla Pain Yo! (habanero, jalapeño, garlic, carrot, orange, cilantro, lime, and salt), which I later customized as a Vampiro, a iuice popular in Mexico City, by substituting beet and celery for the orange. I drank



yerba maté tea whenever I needed an energy boost. "Whenever you start feeling like you can't do it or are ready to quit, just drink the juice," said Shook. "That is your mantra for the next 10 days. Get the juice from wherever it's convenient, like Whole Foods, Juicebox, or any other place, as long as it's fresh-pressed, not bottled." **Bryce Spears**, manager at JuiceLand's Barton Springs branch, was starting a fast the same day as me. "It's all in your head; just remember that," he said. And off I went.

The first few days were absolutely excruciating. My guts grumbled constantly, sometimes so loudly they startled my dogs. Watching commercials was painful - even the nasty "flaming-hot extra-crunch burrito" sounded good. I wasn't missing much as far as flavor, and in general, I felt full, but there was still a sensation of something missing. It was all in my head; just drink the juice. By the fourth day, I noticed a metallic taste and a fuzzy feeling on my teeth. "You might be experiencing some ketosis," said my chef friend **Pamela**

Nevarez-Fisher. "Many people, including myself, go into ketosis during a long fast. It's when elevated ketones build up in your body. The good thing: you're burning fat now and are probably a lot less hungry?" I had no idea what building ketones meant, but I noticed weight loss and less hunger by the sixth day. I felt fantastic, had lots of energy, and even my dreaded allergies had subsided considerably. I watched a movie Shook recommended, Fat, Sick & Nearly Dead, for inspiration. What an eye-opener. I embraced the juice fast with an almost militant conviction, proud of my self-control.

My first taste of food, a bowl of pho from **Elizabeth Street**, was glorious but not because I was dying to eat. "After a juice fast your taste buds are clean and you taste everything more intensely," Shook had told me, and he was right. So I've decided to do a juice fast every three months. I couldn't have predicted that I would become such a convert; I drank the proverbial Kool-Aid, all right.

Also, customers who buy cheese plates featured at any of Antonelli's restaurant clients should save the receipt and redeem it for a 15% discount on any cheese purchased in the store between Feb. 11-18. And as if that isn't enough good news, the couple is expecting a new little cheese lover to join their family in mid-May!

I'd suggest pairing it with some low-sodium, low-calorie **Burnt Orange Texas Salsa** (at stores all over Texas) and a selection of **Beanitos** corn- and gluten-free chips for a somewhat healthier game day repast.


Dinner Is Served

Two Austin takes on the supper club trend

Roving supper clubs and pop-up restaurants are a very hot trend these days. Aspiring and established chefs as well as caterers and passionate home cooks will choose a location, design a menu, send out an email blast or a tweet, and voilà - dinner is served. The Austin food community supports several active supper clubs, many operated by accomplished cateriers. Supper club presentations can keep catering cooks and servers working between scheduled weddings and parties while providing an outlet for creative culinary expression. "When we are catering weddings and parties, the menus have to suit the client's tastes, but coming up with supper club menus gives our chef more room to explore and express himself," explains 2 Dine 4 Fine Catering owner Stephen Shallcross, who hosts Supper Friends at the Swoop House. "We thought about doing a pop-up restaurant, but since we already had this great space and a staff that's willing to work, a supper club seemed like a better idea," reports Brenton Schumacher, owner of Pink Avocado Catering at the Palm Door, where he also hosts Bread & Circus Supper Club.

Supper Friends and Bread & Circus are two very appealing but dramatically different supper clubs with one key element in common: Both companies work out of their own buildings, making it possible for them to host meals whenever they aren't servicing catering customers. Bread & Circus offers monthly, themed affairs open to as many as 100 guests; Supper Friends presents smaller seated dinners two or three times a month. While observing both clubs in action last week, I discovered that the personality of each supper club reflects the influence of its home venue to some extent, and both claim very loyal and satisfied clienteles. When Stephen Shallcross arranged to relocate an early 20th century Hyde Park bungalow to his 2-acre East Austin property, hosting a supper club in the building had never crossed his mind. "We planned to use the house as office space and as a nice place to hold tastings for potential brides," Shallcross told me recently. Once the little house had been moved and restored, the busy caterer did indeed invite three prospective bridal couples to come for the first tasting. The evening was even more successful than Shallcross had anticipated. Not only did all three couples hire 2 Dine 4 as their wedding caterer, but one bride insisted she had enjoyed the evening so much that she'd like to dine there again. "It was like having supper with friends," Shallcross recalls her saying. Not long after, he began inviting friends, as well as former and prospective customers, to small dinner parties, and Supper Friends was born. What started out as a few friends and prospective customers getting together around the table has now grown into a popular supper club with about 2,500 names on the email list.

Here's how it works. Shallcross and Executive Chef Chris Chism design a menu or invite a guest chef such as charcutier Lawrence Kocurek or Uchi's Jay Huang to do so. The menu becomes part of an email invitation that goes out to everyone in the company's email database. The Swoop House can accommodate 24 seated diners, so the first two dozen respondents get places at the comfortable dining tables in the cozy cottage. Prices range from \$45 to \$75 per person, vegetarian options are always

available, and guests are encouraged to bring their own wine because the Swoop House is not licensed to sell alcohol. Meals commence with a complementary cocktail and an amuse-bouche while the guests find their place cards around two big dining tables. Once everyone is seated, the cards are turned toward the center of the table to make it easier for guests to call each other by name. Recorded music plays quietly in the background and conversations evolve as the various courses are presented. Brides who are considering 2 Dine 4 for their wedding caterer have even been known to poll their dinner companions on the popularity of various menu choices. Espresso and cappuccino are offered with dessert, and guests often linger around the table, enjoying conversation with old and new friends.

The Supper Friends parties scheduled during the preparation of this article were already long sold-out, so Shallcross and his staff graciously invited some loyal club members to join us for lunch one day last week. It gave me a chance to sample one of Chism's beautifully balanced winter menus while chatting with my dining companions about how they became regular supper friends. Everyone at the table had high praise for the food as a big attraction, and rightly so, but they also said the atmosphere of conviviality was an equally important drawing card. "I've actually become good friends with a couple of people I met through Supper Friends," said translator Anna Boyet, and Austin Ventures executive assistant Cat Diederich recounted how attending several Supper Friends meals helped her make personal connections when she first moved to Austin. Both Boyet and Sasha Sessums recalled getting valuable tips about pairing food and wines from other guests who brought wines to enjoy with dinner. Everyone at the table shared stories about encountering other adventurous diners who appreciate good food and wine: What's not to love about a group like that?

In addition to bridal tastings and Supper Friends dinners, the Swoop House is available for small private parties, corporate meetings, and cooking classes. For more information and reservations, email info@2Dine4.com or call 467-6600.

Bread and circuses have been a crowdpleasing concept since the heyday of the Coliseum in Rome. In modern-day Austin, catering chef Brenton Schumacher and his staff at Pink Avocado Catering put the ancient concept to good use, satisfying supper club guests with delicious food and creative entertainment. The Pink Avocado crew spends much of its time catering as many as five weddings a weekend, as well as special events (more than 100 during South by Southwest alone) that require menus specifically tailored to the clients' tastes. The monthly Bread & Circus Supper Club gives the crew the opportunity to flex very different hospitality muscles, and the entire staff gets into the act. Everyone collaborates on the seasonal themes, such as a family-style Charlie Brown dinner before the holidays and the upcoming sexy vampire motif for Valentine's Day. Schumacher and his kitchen staff develop menus, mixologist Chris Gentry designs cocktails, and sommelier Marc Sauri plans the wine pairings for each course. Once the theme has been decided, Mariah Price arranges for live entertainment and decorations to enhance the evening's offerings, using the spare, open space at the Palm Door as a blank canvas for art installations, lighting setups, and small-scale musical performances. Event details and menus are announced on the Pink Avocado blog (www. pinkavocadoblog.com), and tickets are sold exclusively at breadandcircus.ticketbud.com. Prices range from \$60-100 a person, depending on the theme of the meal and the number of courses.

The Bread & Circus dinner we attended last week was a clever culinary take on the seven deadly sins. According to Schumacher, he posted a list of the sins on the kitchen bulletin board weeks before the event and encouraged his staff to suggest menu items that would represent lust, wrath, sloth, envy, pride, gluttony, and greed. After much discussion and many revisions, a menu was assembled, entertainment appropriate for an evening centered on sin was arranged, and the party details were posted on the blog. About 60 guests were greeted with a Man's Ruin cocktail representing lust, and the brisk parade of delectable, seasonal dishes that followed were very well-thought-out and attractively executed. That Damn Band provided several sets of original acoustic music in a humorous and slightly risqué burlesque vein, complete with strolling musicians and an elegant fan dancer who harkened back to the days of Sally Rand and Gypsy Rose Lee. (Though I don't consider myself a prude, I will admit to being slightly disconcerted by the presence of visible butt cheeks during dinner, but I'm pretty sure it's not a regular occurrence.) Large tables of

friends lingered after the stellar meal. enjoying the waning party atmosphere, and sipping a chilled Moscato for absolution.

The Palm Door is a full-service party venue, complete with in-house caterer Pink Avocado, a full liquor license, a bridal dressing room, and a deck overlooking Waller Creek. Pink Avocado's upcoming Studio 54-themed party is the largest of Project Transitions' Guess Who's Coming to Dinner events; it's scheduled for this Saturday, Feb. 4, and a few \$100 tickets are still available at 454-8646. The menu and party details for the Bread & Circus Vamped Valentine's Day dinner are live on the blog. Make those reservations quickly.



SXSW FILM ANNOUNCES ITS FEATURE LINEUP

The South by Southwest Film Festival announced Wednesday its 130-film feature lineup for the 2012 festival, including Centerpiece Film 21 Jump Street. The high-profile selection of a reboot of a late Eighties cop show that first made a name for Johnny Depp might seem like a head-scratcher; Film Conference and Festival Producer Janet Pierson admits she's never seen the original show and that she approached the update, which was cowritten by and stars newly minted Oscar nominee Jonah Hill, with "total skepti-

cism." But, Pierson says, "Jonah Hill is somebody whose career is interesting. I think he's done a lot of good work; he's growing up onscreen. He loves SXSW. And we were all surprised – there were five of us watching the film – at how funny it was and how interested it was about the

changing times. It's a real social commentary."

SXSW Film also announced its Closing Night Film, Emmett Malloy's music documentary *Big Easy Express* (featuring Mumford & Sons, Edward Sharpe & the Magnetic Zeros, and Old Crow Medicine Show). Other highlights of the lineup

include Gotham Chopra's personal documentary about his spiritual guru father, *Decoding Deepak*; Jay Chandrasekhar's sperm-bank-heist comedy *The Babymakers*; and the U.S. premiere of the always-polarizing Bobcat Goldthwait's *God Bless America*.

After a fruitful three-year collaboration with Fantastic Fest, SXSW has decided this year to program its entire midnight movies sidebar in-house under

the direction of Jarod Neece (the Midnight program as well as the short film slate will be announced on Feb. 8). Another 2012 shake-up? The elimination of a Texas-specific sidebar. "The rationale was that it didn't seem to be serving the Texas filmmakers," Pierson says. "There is sometimes a percep-

tion with [regional-specific programs] in a festival that it's like you're doing favors for the home team, and they're not necessarily given their due."

Texas filmmakers still have seats at the table, with the world premieres of Bob Byington's Somebody Up There Likes

Me (starring Nick Offerman and Kevin Corrigan) and the Duplass Brothers' latest comedy, *The Do-Deca-Pentathalon*, in the Narrative Spotlight category. Jonny Mars' *America's Parking Lot*, about Dallas Cowboys fans' last season at Texas Stadium, and Andrew Garrison's *Trash Dance*, about Austin's Forklift Danceworks' unique production, will debut in the Documentary Spotlight. University of Texas alum Yaké Smith will screen his dramatic feature *Wolf* in the Emerging Visions sidebar, local darlings the Zellner Bros. bring *Kid-Thing* home after festival berths at Sundance and Berlin, and Richard Linklater will screen *Bernie* (starring Jack Black and Shirley MacLaine) in the Special Events section.

Delving Deeper Into the Archive of a Dark Time

DOC NIGHTS: 'SHOAH: THE UNSEEN INTERVIEWS'

Last year was the 25th anniversary of Shoah, French director Claude Lanzmann's 9½-hours-long, genre-bending documentary about the Holocaust. The film has been heralded since then for the remarkable way it reconstructed the genocide of 6 million European Jews without the use of any historical archival footage, the now-familiar images of death camps, or the mass graves scattered throughout the Polish countryside, holding the remains of Jews who'd been dragged from their village homes and forced to dig the pits they would fall into when they were shot in the head.

Instead, Lanzmann sussed out what he described in interviews at the time as "the machinery of death in all its detail" by subtly and thematically layering the personal recollections of those victims, perpetrators, witnesses, and bystanders he was able to track down in 14 countries over the course of 11 years. These, along with then-present-day footage of the sites where it all took place: the deserted concentration camps, the Polish villages with Poles occupying houses once owned by Jews, the trains moving through the countryside, their cargo cars now freighted with unspeakable associations. Watching Lanzmann's interviews, in close-up, with per-

petrators like the former Nazi death camp commandant who describes the day-to-day nuts and bolts of keeping a death camp running smoothly brings to mind Hannah Arendt's Eichmann trial observations about the "banality of evil." (Interviews such as these were not always granted with a smile and a signed consent form; Lanzmann frequently resorted to the subterfuge of a hidden camera, and was once caught and beaten.)

In the end, Lanzmann recorded more than 300 hours of filmed interviews for the film he edited down to just over nine hours in length. He subsequently donated 220 hours of this archive to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C., (which co-owns the tapes with Israel's Yad Vashem) in order to make them available to scholars and others studying this period of history, explained Leslie Swift, a film researcher at the USHMM's Steven Spielberg Film and Video Archive. (All preserved *Shoah* outtake interviews, with transcriptions, can be viewed online at www.ushmm.org. Fascinating stuff, this.)

Shoah: The Unseen Interviews is a 55-minute compilation of excerpts from three interviews in Lanzmann's Shoah archive, parts of which were included in the original film. The

first is with Abraham Bomba, a Jewish barber whose job as an inmate at Treblinka was to cut the hair of Jews before they entered the gas chambers. The second is Peter Bergson, a Lithuanian-born Jew who talks of his uphill battle to alert the U.S. government and American Jews to the extermination of the European Jews in order to mobilize a response. The third interview is with Ruth Elias, a Czech Jew who describes her horrific pregnancy and the birth of her baby while in the sadistic medical care of Dr. Josef Mengele.

The Austin Chronicle: Why did the USHMM decide to produce this compilation?

Leslie Swift: It in no way reflects the editorial choices made by Claude Lanzmann in the making of his film. At the same time, it is not a stand-alone project, stemming as it does from the interviews conducted by Lanzmann. In the presentations that archive staff give to introduce the film we, of course, refer

to *Shoah* and the themes that emerge in that film. However, the outtake interviews are extremely wide-ranging, covering the lives these people lived before the war, controversial issues of collaboration, American responses to the Holocaust, and much, much more. With this compilation, we wanted to begin to explore some of these themes.

AC: Is there a theme underlying your selection of these interviews? **LS:** We wanted to show outtakes from one

interview that was heavily used in the film, Abraham Bomba, one that was very little used, Ruth Elias, and one that wasn't used at all in the final film, Peter Bergson. Bomba's interview focuses on those parts of his story other than the killing process. Ruth Elias' experience could only happen to a woman, and we wanted to say something about the particular ways in which women experienced the Holocaust. Peter Bergson talks about American responses (or lack thereof), which is of interest to American audiences. Besides that, we were restricted to English-language interviews because of the prohibitive costs of translating and subtitling foreign-language interviews.

AC: Do you plan more of these compilations, or is this simply a one-off?

LS: We hope there will be further programs, but right now our focus is on bringing attention to this remarkable collection and encouraging scholars and others to want to know more.

Mother's Little Monster

Lynne Ramsay and Tilda Swinton on the complexities of their Columbine-inspired collaboration

Nothing prepares you for coming face to face with Tilda Swinton. This Oscar-winning actress cuts an imposing figure: tall, redheaded, androgynous, fashionable, and regal, yet looking as though she might be a near relative of David Bowie's alien Ziggy Stardust alter ego. Swinton's résumé is no less striking. Iconoclastic is the word that best describes her work and the numerous gender-bending roles she's played in addition to parts that plumb deep questions of identity and self. She has worked with many of the most challenging directors of our time, as well as others whose films have few prospects beyond the festival circuit. Her multifilm col-

laboration with the gay experimental film-maker Derek Jarman early in her career led to work with such other distinctive artists as Spike Jonze, Sally Potter, and Jim Jarmusch. Swinton has also been featured in many popular American movies, appearing as the White Witch in *The Chronicles of Narnia* films, one of the goofy lead characters in the Coen brothers' *Burn After Reading*, a key figure in David Fincher's *The Curious Case of Benjamin Button*, and the duplicitous and cutthroat attorney in *Michael Clayton* – the role for which she received her Oscar.

Along with director Lynne Ramsay, Swinton is one of the executive producers of We Need To Talk About Kevin. Involved in the project from its early script stages, Swinton also helped shape the film during its editing process. The movie is adapted from author Lionel Shriver's award-winning novel of the same name, a tragic and deeply unsettling story set in the post-Columbine era. The film discards the novel's epistolary structure in favor of more dramatically focused storytelling. Nonlinear while also burrowing relentlessly toward the narrative's core, the film is a harrowing journey.

Swinton plays Eva Khatchadourian, the mother of a teenage boy who goes on a killing rampage. Eva's voyage through grief, guilt, and acceptance form the crux of the story, which also observes Kevin's puzzling connections to his family. From infancy, Kevin is a peculiar child who is born with a seeming tendency toward sociopathy, but his mother's ill-fitting relationship with him is an undeniable factor in his perverse evolution. Viewers will differ in their opinions of the motivations of Kevin (who is played brilliantly by Ezra Miller in his teenage years, and Jasper Newell and Rock Duer during different stages of his childhood) and those of his uneasy mother, Eva. The mother and son's tense pas de deux is a dance that's out of step with their other family relationships. (John C. Reilly plays Eva's husband, and Ashley Gerasimovich plays her younger daughter.) It's a relationship that only finds firm footing in the aftermath of disaster.

I interviewed Swinton and Ramsay in September at the Toronto International Film Festival. Though each interview was conducted separately, many of the questions asked and topics discussed overlapped and are combined below. Swinton was thoroughly disarming as she pulled up a chair to face me. Sitting erect and nearly knee-to-knee with her interviewer, she asked almost as many questions of me as I of her. Ramsay, a talkative Scottish director, has a sunny disposition that belies the dark recesses of

her previous feature films, Ratcatcher and Morvern Callar. Nine years have intervened since the release of her last feature in 2002. One project that was dear to her heart during this time was an adaptation of The Lovely Bones, the popular novel that was ultimately made into a film by Peter Jackson. Despite turning in "a million drafts," Ramsay parted ways with the producers when they couldn't reach an accord on how the movie should be made. Eventually, another novel caught her eye: We Need To Talk About Kevin.

Austin Chronicle: The title of this movie is so appropriate because viewers come away from it really wanting to talk.


Tilda Swinton: It is to be talked about. There's nothing fixed in the film. Whether we live with children or have had children or not, we've all been children; we've all had mothers. And we've all seen moments on our mothers' faces that we haven't necessarily understood when we were children. But you do understand more when you become a parent yourself - moments of cluelessness and being lost and also that searching for the mask to put it back on again, that feeling that your mother might not be completely authentic and not knowing quite how to get her to come back to full attention. I think we've all experienced that. It's not actually very exotic.

AC: We Need To Talk About Kevin also delves into the very taboo subject matter of what happens when a mother isn't crazy about her offspring or about being a mother. Lynne Ramsay: It's a dirty little secret, that. It's like, "Oh god, I know someone like that." Everyone does. ... I like stories about strong women, and stories that have never been told.

TS: There's really an assumption that that maternal instinct is an inevitable thing and – whether we know mothers who have had this terrible experience of having a child and that instinct not kicking in or whether it's the children of those mothers – we all know at least







somebody who's been through that experience. There's this habit these days of editing experience and only choosing the Hallmark card aspects of life. Life's much more interesting and tougher than Hallmark would have us believe - more interesting and better, more shades and more substance, and more worth living as well.

AC: I was struck by some people's reaction to the movie as a perverse kind of love story. I had been thinking of it more in terms of a horror movie.

TS: We talked about it [during the shoot] as a war film as well. This is one of the reasons

why we worked in widescreen. There's that sort of Sergio Leone standoff with Kevin on one side of the frame and Eva on the other. I remember years ago reading a book by a very erudite film semiotician, and he was talking about unconscious placement in a cinema frame. Because we read from left to right, what one tends to do unconsciously as a filmmaker is put the protagonist on the left of frame and the antagonist - the problem - on the right. And interestingly enough, and I remember

saying this to Lynne after we'd completed shooting, that every time we got to a point where Kevin and Eva were put like that, Eva was always the problem. He's the leading aspect and she's the antagonist.

LR: In a way, Kevin takes everyone else out, so his mother has to pay him attention. They're left together at the end. Mothers, whatever the damage, that's your son. People say it's a horror film, but this is more terrifying because it's real. ... It's a scary film in many ways, but it's a ride. It's a "what if" or the worst-case scenario.

AC: It's so much Eva's point of view throughout the story.

think, for her, that is the worst part of all of this horror. Not that she looks at him and he's a foreign element. What's really horrific is that she understands him only too well. He's so familiar. He is her. He came out of her; the apple did not fall far from

> thing, I always say, "Its mother loves it." I just realized the truth of what I've always said to her: Its mother loves it.


> AC: I love Lynne Ramsay's color sense and the way she moves objects through the frame is remarkable.







Freeway View

Over on East Riverside Drive while visiting the **Beauty Ballroom** the day of its first show last week, the slap of fresh paint on the banister echoed hollowly and sawdust dappled the crocodile carpet upstairs. The sound of music in Austin last year was not measured in dBs or by going to 11; it was in the rumble of moving trucks that effectively shifted the creative heart of the music scene east of I-35.

Yes, doors were opening that evening and clubs are always a work in progress, as Chase Hoffberger relates in this issue's cover story, "We Built This City," p.40. The eastern migration began quietly years ago, before the **Scoot Inn** was refurbished and the Longbranch Inn opened and Justine's became the place to go. And why not? In the Fifties and Sixties, East 11th Street was happenin', baby (see "Bright Lights, Inner City," July 4, 2003):

"By the late Fifties, East 11th Street and its jog up 12th was Austin's musical destination, much as Sixth Street is now. 'Lit up like Broadway,' is how some describe the snaking blocks of clubs that attracted jazz, blues, and R&B players of every caliber. Clubs with names such as the Clock Lounge, Good Daddy's, the Palladium, the Shamrock, Slim's, and Steamboat attracted a lively following. Like Harlem, the scene jumped with lines to get into clubs, flashy cars, and welldressed patrons of every color out for the weekend stroll. For a young musician like [Blues Boy] Hubbard, it was heaven."

I wrote that in 2003, and if I were writing it today, one phrase would read, "Much as Sixth Street was in the Eighties and Nineties, before it was dumbed down by the inevitable

MOSER grip of progress and the almighty goddamn dollar." The directional shift is economic, no question, but there's more at work here than money. The clubs in and around Red River have pulsed with Austin's lifeblood for decades, the true creative centers for musical expression simply because they offered affordable real estate conveniently located where no one else wanted to be. Now "people" want to be there, so move those dirty, blue-ieaned asses out of the way for the new, pressediean asses.

Driving under the freeway and down East Sixth last Saturday night, I found the streets lined with cars, nary a parking spot in sight. James McMurtry and his band were at the **Gypsy Lounge**, on a short block between Onion and Comal streets that also houses the Volstead Lounge, Hotel Vegas, a parking lot, and longtime neighborhood bar La Perla. Across the street sits the venerable Cisco's and Nuevo Leon restaurants. Tucked in the alleys are food trailers – the street gave off an electric hum.

January 2011 I house-sat for a friend who lives around the corner from Sam's BBQ on East 12th. It was the bright spot of that week when everything froze. It reminded me of when I'd lived in the neighborhood in the Seventies and Eighties. No car, broke dependent on a bus system that stopped at 10pm for getting to the grocery store and hauling clothes to the Laundromat. I walked a lot and bummed a lot of rides, with the occasional taxi splurge. Last weekend, East Sixth reminded me of Austin before the neon storm.

"Like when Steamboat had those 'secret shows' and Eric Johnson would show up," Mike Villegas reminisced Saturday.

Like standing outside the One Knite's coffin-shaped door while Little Stevie Vaughan played to 41 people in 1973. Like being down on the Drag in 1979 when Raul's bubbled with life. Like hanging around outside **Club Foot** and Liberty Lunch in the Eighties, watching the cars go by while the **Butthole Surfers** ripped it up inside, feeling the music in the air. Like the Red River revival of the early Nineties, when every purposeful step on the sidewalk brought you closer to nirvana. Even the cold felt good last weekend; just pull up the collar and stuff the hands a little deeper in the pockets. Look, here's the White Horse!

I fantasized on the phone Monday morning with **Susan Antone** about starting a hot dog trailer in an open lot with a stage for U-18 bands (my idea) and calling it Cliffy's. Or CJ's or Little Clifford's or something like that. What kind of crazy do you have to be to want to open a club?

> Mike Villegas opened the Gypsy Lounge "one year and two months ago," he pondered, sitting on a couch below a TV showing The Misfits. Onscreen, Marilyn

Monroe whacked a paddleball for Clark Gable and a bar full of leering cowboys. Inside his own bar, the veteran drummer for the lan Moore Band was very aware of what the changing face of East Sixth

means not only for local music, but also for the neighborhood. He bought a house just blocks away and knows full well the impact an increased influx of people has on the community.

"It's a little of the old 'Be careful what you wish for," he smiled, taking a break from coaxing to life the cranky propane heaters by the outdoor stage. Even a crack staff doesn't lift the weight of ownership. He's talking, but his gaze scans the cozy, red-lit interior in regular intervals, like the ultimate pit boss. The inside holds about 80, but the outside holds

three times that easily when set up as it is for McMurtry.

"There's definitely a different vibe on the weekends; it changes then," Villegas observed, "During the week, we get a lot of people who live around here. And this is still uncharted territory. It reminds me a little of the Lower East Side in New York, with cool bands and underground clubs. There's a lot of freedom around here."

He has a point. The strip of clubs along East Sixth feels more familiar to anyone coming to Austin from major cities or Europe than the antiseptic whitewash of Sixth Street west of the interstate. "Where is your city?," a Dutch friend kept asking, walking around Downtown during South by Southwest some years back. When we looped across East 11th Street and passed by the Texas Music Museum and the Victory Grill, he lit up. "Here's your city!" I think he meant he was seeing black and brown faces in numbers he expected, but whatever it was, he seemed content that he had finally seen the "city."

Success will mean growth, and that means growing pains for the residents too, not to mention the increase of SXSW activity east of the freeway.

"I thought, 'Yeah, I know how to prepare,'" recalls Villegas of the Gypsy Lounge's first SXSW last year. "They were banging on the door at 9am on St. Patrick's Day. Come this spring, it will be a madhouse."

Already, the Gypsy Lounge finds itself having to make accommodations for an act like McMurtry. Tonight, both indoor bathrooms are marked: "For this event, Women Only. Men's restroom located outside - Port a Potty." At the far end of the deep lot, through the stage area tented for weather, is the florescent-lit Dot's Spot advertising exotic combos like the Chutney Curry Chzburger.

East Sixth isn't for everyone. It's a little funky without the frat-crowd lures and killer drink specials. But it's local music being played in clubs willing to take chances and that's good Austin mojo.

Meanwhile, a rumble of applause and a surge toward the back door followed by an electric twang meant James McMurty and the band had plugged in. Showtime at the Gypsy Lounge.

There's a new honky-tonk in hipville, and there's music every night.

"I feel like an alien around here," cracks Denis O'Donnell, co-owner of the White Horse.

The new music venue at Fifth and Comal streets, previously Club La Trampa, already draws raves as the Eastside home of rawhide roots.

"Thursday through Sunday, I'm going to capitalize on the people that are already excited about this part of town," he waves three days before the club's December opening. "It'll be a free show and it won't be, 'Shhh, there's a band playing.' It also won't be blasting people out of the room. It's going to be a nice 'in the middle.' Country music does that very well. And so does bluegrass, so does blues, so does jazz."

O'Donnell and partner Nathan Hill have taken a page from their days managing the Hole in the Wall, wrangling together a series of house bands that hold down semipermanent residencies to fill out each week. Blues trio Mrs. Glass plays Tuesdays, Mike & the Moonpies get outlaw on Thursday. On Sundays, pedal steel guitarist Bob Hoffnar leads the White Horse Orchestra through jazz with a Texas swing twist. O'Donnell says that method of booking will help establish the White Horse as an institution that people turn to the same way they turn to the Continental Club and the Saxon Pub.

"It's our job as musicians and as club owners to make people excited again to go see a band," he insists. "Before the culture of Sixth Street, you didn't look in the paper to see who was playing. You knew some of those clubs had good bands, and you had a date and went Downtown. You would see live music. There was a culture of people who used to go see live bands without a destination. Those days are over."

The White Horse is packed on weekends and fills up considerably on off nights, yet it's far from being the only East Austin hot spot making waves in a live music scene that all but reinvented itself wholesale in the last months of

Six blocks west, just before the highway, is the ND at 501 Studios, a multipurpose performance space complete with a 20-foot-by-30-foot projection wall that former Electric

Lounge owner Mike Henry finished conmusic venue over the summer. Running along the east side of Sixth Street between the White Horse and ND are four new spaces stacked smack in the middle of Austin's hot-

test entertainment district: Cheer Up Charlie's, the Volstead Lounge, Hotel Vegas, and the Gypsy Lounge, a 30-person venue with a 300-capacity backyard stage (see "One, Two, Tres, Cuatro," p.39). A few miles east on Webberville Road, the Sahara Lounge picks up where the beloved TC's Lounge left off last year, with stormy Monday blues nights and African music every Saturday.

The proximity of these venues is par for the course in Austin, where entertainment districts have formed in clus-

ters since the Sixth Street explosion of the Eighties. What's fascinating is the rate at which they've gone up. Of the six Eastside venues mentioned, not a single room hosted shows with any semblance of regularity before last March, a rate of growth that trumps even Red River's run of the last decade.

What's more is that those venues aren't going up alone. Neither are they appearing solely on the other side of the tracks, either, Skinny's Ballroom opened its doors on Second Street and San Jacinto last February, just around the corner from the Austin Convention Center. Frank, a gourmet hot dog shop in the middle of Austin's central business district near Antone's, now hosts live music weekly and runs midweek

The ongoing Waller Creek Tunnel Project, intended to clean up our city's grittiest street, forced Frank Hendrix's Emo's out in the fall; raised questions about Red 7, whose lease is up this summer (it's under corporate sponsorship

through South by Southwest); and ushered the Beauty Bar's decision to call it guits on Seventh Street sometime after March. Transmission Entertainment, titans of Red River thanks to a presence at Mohawk, Club de Ville, Red 7, and Beauty Bar also has expansion plans east of the highway on Fifth Street. Only the Swan Dive, Harvey Graham's flapper-studded ballroom at Seventh and Red River, seems to have built any type of live music presence in the transforming neighborhood.

Across the river, Hendrix sits perched on the next frontier, East Riverside, where the AMLI South Shore is filling up and new residential megaplexes (CityView, Grayco Apartments, Cypress Real Estate) are on the way. Hendrix completed major redevelopment of the old Back Room in September, where now rises the gleaming Emo's East, and with Beauty Bar management, opened the Beauty Ballroom last week on the same block. Both parties are betting the strip there will be the next boom in live entertainment thanks to the existing and new residences.

"We're hoping that whatever [businesses] comes in accentuates what we do," says Hendrix, who notes he's received five or six calls a week from people inquiring about the neighborhood. "A coffee shop's going up across the street once we're done [with Beauty Ballroom]."

Z-Ro and Trae tha Truth perform next door at Emo's on Feb. 11. If it's not a sellout, there will be more than enough attendees to see East Riverside as a hot nightlife destination. CityView is slated for completion in 2013. That's when the masses move over. Hendrix thinks Lamar and Oltorf is the next hub to turn after that.

"If you got the right show," he says, "you could be in the middle of nowhere and people will show up."

Medical Marvels: The *British Medical Journal* reported in December 2011 that a 76-year-old woman had been untroubled until recently by the felt-tipped pen she accidentally swallowed 25 years earlier. It was removed without complication, and, though the plastic was flaky, the pen still had an ink supply and was "usable."

LEAD STORY

Traditional bridge replacement on a highway as prominent as Interstate 15 in Mesquite, Nev., has generally required rerouting traffic for as long as a year, but new accelerated technology in January necessitated detours for less than a week. Excited engineers traveled in from around the country to watch the old bridge's demolition, followed by the new one (which had been built on a platform off to the side) being slid into place using hydraulic jacks and Teflon-coated metal beams - lubricated with Dawn dish-washing detergent to glide them smoothly into the old frame. The Nevada Department of Transportation estimated that the accelerated process saved commuters about \$12 million in time and fuel costs.

THE ENTREPRENEURIAL SPIRIT!

"[Our critics] are absolutely right. We are professional liars," said Everett Davis, founder of the Internet-based Reference Store, which supplies pumped-up but false résumés for job-seekers having trouble landing work. Davis and associates are, he told Houston's KRIV-TV in November 2011, ex-investigators schooled in deception and therefore good at fooling human resources personnel who follow up on the bogus work claims. Davis admitted he would even disguise a customer's past criminal record – but not if the job is in public safety, health care, or schools.

Veterinary technician and food blogger Lauren Hicks recently inaugurated service on what is surely one of the few food trucks in the country catering exclusively to dogs. She parks her Sit 'N Stay Pet Cafe – a retrofitted mail truck – in downtown Winter Park, Fla., on Thursday nights (according to an October 2011 *Orlando Sentinel* report), serving gourmet organic snacks like the Poochi Sushi

(jerky), Ruff-in Muffins, and Mutt-balls and Grrr-avy, among other specialties.

Western nations and foundations have tried for decades to build sewage treatment plants in sub-Saharan Africa with little success (since many countries lack stable governments to assess operating fees), and to this day, raw sewage is still merely collected and dumped, either in rivers or directly onto beaches, such as the notorious and formerly beautiful Lavender Hill in Ghana. U.S. entrepreneurs recently established Waste Enterprises in Ghana to build the first ever fecal-sludge-to-biodiesel plant, funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Feces undiluted by water, and then heated, are highly concentrated and resemble coal rather than the goo that Americans associate with sewage.

CUTTING-EDGE SCIENCE

Medical Marvels: Twice during 2011, babies with two heads were born in Brazil. Though the first, in the Paraiba region, died hours after birth, the 9.9-pound Emanoel and Jesus, born in the Para region in December, are apparently otherwise healthy. The baby has two heads and two spines but shares one heart, liver, pelvis, and pair of lungs.

Medical Marvels (Canine Edition): The Dogs Trust in Kenilworth, England, was soliciting potential homes in December 2011 for Bentley, a Border Collie whose monophobia might make it what the *Daily Mail* calls the most cowardly dog in the country. While frisky around people, Bentley immediately goes into a frightened sulk when left alone, cowering from cats, holing up behind a couch, and constantly biting his nails, even at the sound of a cat on television. Bentley was recently outfitted with special booties to preserve the nails.

Ratnagiri, India, businessman Murad Mulla, 48, filed a complaint recently with the Maharashtra Medical Council after his surgeon used an outdated procedure to cure his urineretention disorder. Previously, skin from the scrotum was routinely used for urethral repair, but current science recommends using skin from the mouth to avoid the worst-case risk, which Mulla apparently experienced. Specifically, the scrotum contains both hair-bearing tissue and non-hair-bearing tissue, and only the latter is usable. Evidently, Mullas' surgeon used hair-bearing tissue, and as a result, Mulla's urethra itches constantly, and he expels specks of pubic hair with his urine.

Bernard Madoff's Ponzi scheme cost 16,500 investors a total of as much as \$18 billion, according to the court-appointed trustee, but at least Madoff is not on death row. In Hangzhou, China, in November 2011, Ji Wenhua and his brother and their father (who were managers of the Yintai Real Estate and Investment Group) were sentenced to death after their convictions for cheating 15,000 investors out of the equivalent of \$1.1 billion. Prosecutors said the men had continued to collect money by claiming profits while losses mounted.

News of the Privileged: Among the high-end items catching consumers' fancy last holiday season was premium firewood, for those who need to burn trees for reasons beyond merely warming the house. Pretty white birch logs were a bestselling item for Paul's Fireplace Wood of Little Falls, Minn., and the owner of J.N. Firewood in Fort Ripley, Minn., touted its "really cool blue flame and crackling noises" according to a December *Wall Street Journal* report. The wood itself goes for well over \$1 a pound, even before adding the substantial shipping cost.





Day Trips

The hot mineral waters of Marlin

have been curing the afflicted and maintaining the healthy for 120 years. Doris Scraggs has been visiting the public fountain for more than half of that time, and she is pretty spry.

"Anytime I get a cut or a sore, I come rinse it in the water for a few minutes for two or three days, and it heals in no time " she said

The city discovered the mineral water in 1892. The water was considered bad until its curative properties were discovered. By 1900, several bathhouses, spas, and hospitals were operating in town. Conrad Hilton opened his eighth hotel here.

The last bathhouse closed in the 1960s. "It was penicillin that did the bathhouses in," Doris said. "Folks from up north didn't need to come down here to get their VD cured."



"Drink two glasses of the water a day and you'll feel great," she said. The 110-degree water comes out of spigots and flows into the marble basin with a high concentration of sodium and sulphates. "Just hold your nose and imagine you're drinking chicken bullion," Doris said with a laugh.

The Municipal Hygeia pavilion at 245 Coleman St. has provided free hot mineral water since 1903 on the site of the original artesian well. The Marlin visitors center is in a portion of the pavilion.



We Need To Talk About Kevin

D: Lynne Ramsay; with Tilda Swinton, Ezra Miller, John C. Reilly, Ashley Gerasimovich, Jasper Newell, Rock Duer, (R. 112 min.)

Nature, nurture, or just plain evil? That's the question at the heart of this savage and sorrowful portrait of a mother attempting to survive

after her teenage son goes on a premeditated killing spree at his high school. Lay aside everything you thought you knew about random, inexplicable tragedies of this sort; director Lynne Ramsay and Tilda Swinton have reconfigured everymom's nightmare, and the result is one of the most heartbreaking films of the year.

Ramsay (Morvern Callar) shatters the linear nature of her narrative to mirror the all-consuming grief and confusion of Swinton's Eva, a fortysomething mother who, it is implied, came to motherhood somewhat reluctantly after a youth spent

writing for travel magazines and hopping around the globe in that pursuit. We first see her in the throes of ecstasy at some faraway religious pilgrimage, drenched in what at first

appears to be blood. (It's not.) She's a free spirit, and when she finally settles down with a good and understanding man (Reilly), there's the sense, in Eva's mind and ours, that she has removed herself from her true calling. And yet, she appears to be happy in her newfound ordinary personhood.

Then she gives birth to Kevin (played as a toddler by Duer, as an adolescent by Newell, and as a teenager by Miller). From the start it's an almost Omen-esque battle of wills between mother and child. Kevin refuses to potty-train, throws tantrums, and defaces everything and everyone - except his father, who just can't seem to grasp the doomy chaos in his own household - until

Eva can take no more. Yet she does. Is the problem post-post-postpartum depression? Not hardly: This kid, with his vacant yet terrible gaze and his angelic good looks, makes Patty McCormack in The Bad Seed look like Nick Cave, loverman. Miller's portrayal of an amoral, insidious teen from hell is pitchperfect. He's lovely to look at, but there's a devil inside. And it's a calculating one, fomenting wrongness from cradle to grave.

Swinton, as Eva, is flat-out amazing. Since much of the film unfolds in flashback with Ramsay dropping in small, tantalizing bits of information slowly, we're steadily

presented with an achingly painful picture of motherhood and childhood – gone utterly haywire. Shunned by her neighbors, her home defaced by teenage boys, Eva never-

theless maintains her dignity in the midst of the worst thing possible. And it never ends.

We Need To Talk About Kevin is a modern American horror story, and one that in the wake of Columbine and other apparently random teen atrocities, strikes me as tremendously brave. Ramsay has chosen to focus not on the awful events but on the deep, red scars those events leave on those who survive. It's a disturbing film on many, many levels, but beautifully shot (by Seamus McGarvey) and shot through with a horrific sense of false hope. The kid is not all right.

BIG MIRACLE

D: Ken Kwapis; with Drew Barrymore, John Krasinski, Kristen Bell, Dermot Mulroney, Tim Blake Nelson, Vinessa Shaw, Ted Danson, John Chase. (PG, 107 min.)

In the interest of due diligence - OK, mostly just directionless Googling - I looked up the book on which Big Miracle, a fictionalized account of an actual 1988 rescue operation of three gray whales trapped in ice near Point Barrow, Alaska, is based, Tom Rose's Freeing the Whales: How the Media Created the World's Greatest Non-Event. At the time. Kirkus Reviews noted that "Barrow has the highest rates in America of murder, rape, suicide, alcoholism, and wife-beating." Huh. Ripe enough stuff for a CSI: Arctic Outpost, but not exactly fodder for the Hollywood machine. Predictably, Big Miracle's creative team has sanded down the rough edges and brought to the fore the most universally soothing and inspiring aspects of the story. Less predictably, it's a moving entertainment.

The Office's John Krasinski, leaning on that appealing mix of decency and doofiness on which he's built a career, plays Alaskan TV reporter Adam Carlson. Looking for a big break, he gets it by way of those very big whales: two adults and their struggling offspring, who, having overstayed their time in Alaska, find a thick sheath of new ice blocking their path to warmer climes. Adam's story gets picked up by the affiliate, and soon enough, the major networks take notice, especially after Adam's fire-breathing ex, Greenpeace activist Rachel Kramer (Barrymore), gets involved. In short order, tiny Barrow is filled to bursting with reporters smelling human-interest gold, military and government officials injecting their two cents, an oil CEO with an agenda (played by Ted Danson with the same jovial-corporate-bastard routine he finessed on FX's Damages), and the local Inuit tribe, struggling with its own subsistence needs (whale meat numbering high on the list) and the white-hot glare of a media spotlight.

The logistics of Operation Breakthrough, as it came to be known, are mind-boggling but skillfully dispatched, and sturdy director Ken Kwapis (He's Just Not That Into You) mixes the right jigger amounts of suspense, sentimentality, carefully portioned environmentalist outrage, and humor. (Half the laughs come by way of the Eighties milieu; I toed a guffaw when a government worker uttered the words, "Gorbachev has been asking us to trust him on this glasnost thing.") Big Miracle is all formula, but with just enough savvy to temper the gentle-spiritedness and qualify it as that rare family film with an emotional manipulativeness that doesn't leave a sick slick in the mouth. - Kimberley Jones

From out of left field comes this PG-13 thriller that breathes new life into the foundfootage formula which has become so popular in the dozen or so years since The Blair Witch Project. Like a marriage of Cloverfield and Carrie, Chronicle blends its faux-naif

techniques with a teen telekinesis plot to create something that feels fresh and authentic. Add in the facts that the three young lead actors are all relative unknowns and that the director is a first-timer and it seems as though Chronicle is going to deliver on all the viral buzz it's been generating. At any rate, 20th Century Fox seems confident enough in its product to release it amid the distracting ruckus of Super Bowl weekend.

Max Landis (son of John) wrote the screenplay from a story idea hatched by director Joshua Trank and himself. The three central characters are all familiar types in the teen film universe. Andrew (DeHaan) is the shy and withdrawn one who is bullied at school and traumatized at home by his abusive father and dying mother. He is the one that purchases a camcorder at the beginning of the film to "chronicle" his dull life. Andrew's only buddy is his cousin Matt (Russell), whose seeming cool masks the usual postadolescent insecurities. Steve (Jordan) is an outgoing and popular guy, a shoo-in for class president. They become a threesome when, by happenstance, Matt and Steve discover a weird sinkhole that opens into a cave and induce Andrew to descend into it with them and his camera. Once inside, they discover some kind of Fortress of Solitude-like hub with a light show and a crystal that apparently bestows upon them the gift of telekinesis.

Boys being boys, the group employs its new powers in prankish endeavors: moving objects around in a shopping mall and messing with people's minds. Then they discover they can control their own bodies and begin flying like supermen, but instead of searching out evildoers, they bound through the clouds like wish-fulfilled kids chasing a football. There's no kindly adult around them to teach "with great power comes great responsibility," so before long, troubled Andrew starts using his newfound abilities in selfish and destructive ways. By the end of the film, most of their home town of Seattle lies in ruin – the result of Andrew's hubris (yes, that's the word they use) and thirdact retribution against all who done him wrong.

Then there's also the nosebleeds the boys experience when their powers get too fierce, which calls to mind Carrie's gym shower taunts to "plug it up" when her menstrual blood first unleashes her telekinetic abilities. Chronicle knows its forebears but manages to reconfigure some of them and get the whole teenage gestalt just right. Andrew's realization that he can control his camera with his mind allows us to see its grainy, shaky footage from a vantage point that could only be otherwise explained by a fourth participant. Chronicle may go over the top with its climax, but for such a giddy film, it's remarkably down to earth.

O THE GREY

D: Joe Carnahan: with Liam Neeson. Dallas Roberts. Frank Grillo, Dermot Mulroney, Nonso Anozie, Joe Anderson, Ben Bray. (R, 117 min.)

It's men vs. wolves in The Grey, and the only dancing that occurs in this film is a violent dance of death. The Grey is gripping and remarkably nuanced for what appears, at

first glance, to be a simple story about man against nature. (And make no mistake, this film features a cast that is all male, except for the brief, nearly dialogue-free appearances of one bartender, two flight attendants, and a wife and daughter who appear in flashbacks.) Although the film belongs to Liam Neeson from start to finish, a strong sense of character pervades all the supporting players.

Neeson is Ottway, a suicidal alpha male who is employed by an oil company on the Alaskan tundra to shoot the wolves that prey on its pipeline workers. While heading out on leave, the workers' plane crashes in the Alaskan wilderness, leaving only seven survivors. Survival is the key word, and no sooner do they pilfer warm clothes and food from the crash debris than one of them steps a few feet away from the group and is promptly taken out by a wolf. Thus begins their grueling, frigid trek toward the tree line, on the advise of Ottway. Along the way, with an economy of dialogue, we get to know a little something about all the survivors. The script by Ian Mackenzie Jeffers is based on his short story, "Ghost Walker." Its spare outline is a good match for the film's unforgiving setting, and the crisp, lean direction is totally unexpected from Joe Carnahan, whose résumé (The A-Team; Smokin' Aces; Blood, Guts, Bullets and Octane) is chock-full of blustery showcases of masculine bravado.

The film is an intelligent study of the will to live. It's so strong that even a suicidal man rises to the occasion. Some viewers have reported dismay with the film's fairly unequivocal ending, but I think that's more a matter of misleading marketing. In any case, stick around through the closing credits for an additional shot that appears at the very end of the film. It doesn't really clarify anything, but it may satisfy some of the bloodlust set in motion by the film's trailer. There is a definite disconnect between the marketing and the reality of *The Grey*.

THE INNKEEPERS

D: Ti West; with Sara Paxton, Pat Healy, Kelly McGillis, George Riddle, Lena Dunham, Brenda Cooney. (R, 100 min.)

Ti West knows how to get under our skin and make us danse macabre. Over the course of his young career, he's almost single-handedly revitalized the moribund American indie horror genre. 2009's The House of the Devil is a dead-on take on Eighties-era scares, and now, with The

Innkeepers, West proves himself a consummate master of the slow-burning shudder. His aesthetic is low-key, both in the pacing of his films and in the narratives themselves, but inevitably, by the time the end credits roll, you suddenly realize you've gnawed your fingernails down to their bloody quicks.

Purportedly based on kinda-sorta true events (or, more likely, rumors, inklings, and general weirdness) experienced by West and his crew while staying at a small New England inn during The House of the Devil shoot, The Innkeepers is a model of creeping dread. Claire and Luke (Paxton and Healy) are a pair of twentysomethings manning the front desk at the soon-to-close Yankee Pedlar Inn, a job that's by turns stultifyingly dull and genuinely spooky. Luke spends his frequent downtime setting up audiovisual equipment hoping to record some of the alleged paranormal activity for which the inn is known. Claire, for her part, wanders around, helps Luke with his (abysmally designed) ghosthunting website, and generally maintains a sense of complete postteen snark, at least until Top Gun's Kelly McGillis, as a spiritually attuned guest, enters the picture.

What makes *The Innkeepers* such an unnerving experience isn't the outright horror but rather the lack of it. West mines every single floorboard creek and shadowy corridor for maximum frisson; this film ventures far beyond creepy and into the rarely explored land of genuine, incremental fear. Lead actors Paxton and Healy are perfectly cast, and Paxton, in particular, comes across as enjoyably goofy: part tomboy, part ghost hunter, all cool.

West's predilection for the unnerving hearkens back to the sublimely atmospheric stories of H.P. Lovecraft. Indeed, *The Innkeepers* has a fairly distinct Lovecraftian feel to it: all New England rustlings, gloom, and an omnipresent sense that something, somewhere, is not quite right. That's a difficult tone to sustain throughout an entire movie, but West pulls it off in high style. When he says "Boo!," you jump. (And don't even think about going down into the basement.)


ONE FOR THE MONEY


D: Julie Anne Robinson; with Katherine Heigl, Jason O'Mara, John Leguizamo, Daniel Sunjata, Sherri Shepherd, Debbie Reynolds, Fisher Stevens. (PG-13, 106 min.)

Without a doubt, there is an audience for this film. It's based on the first book of mystery writer Janet Evanovich's hugely popular series starring Stephanie Plum, a New Jersey bounty hunter. But wouldn't it make more sense on basic cable? Plum's screen incarnate (and film producer) Katherine Heigl got her start in TV, on Roswell and Grey's Anatomy,

and her public persona – a combination of prickliness and adoration-seeking that has famously grated on viewers' and critics' nerves alike – has historically played better there.

Perhaps, too, the fundamental incompetence - of Plum, the premise, and the film's glancing relationship to reality – might seem less grating on small-stakes TV. Writ large on the multiplex screen, Plum is an idiot - a girly girl playacting at tough broad. When she gets sacked from her job at a lingerie counter, Plum improbably becomes a bounty hunter, collaring bail-jumpers for her cousin's bond shop, despite knowing zilch about the business (how to operate a firearm, for instance, or cuff a crook without instigating a shootout). Plum has her eye on a big fish - a rogue cop wanted for first-degree murder, Joe Morelli (O'Mara). This one's personal. Plum doesn't give a lick whether Morelli is a stone-cold killer; she just wants payback for Morelli's ungallant behavior after he popped her cherry back in high school.

THE WOMAN IN BLACK

D: James Watkins; with Daniel Radcliffe, Ciarán Hinds, Janet McTeer, Liz White, Shaun Dooley. (PG-13, 96 min.)

Oh, where's that boy wizard from Hogwarts when you need him? It turns out that Daniel Radcliffe did not bring his sorcerer's wand with him when he graduated to his first adult film role since the conclusion of the *Harry* Potter series. Too bad. Magic powers would have come in handy when dealing with the malevolent ghost that haunts this spookhouse tale, the first film in 35 years to be shot in Great Britain under the venerable Hammer Film banner.

Set in turn-of-the-century England, The Woman in Black is drenched in Victorian gothic horror tropes. Radcliffe anchors the film as Arthur Kipps, a widower and father of a young boy, whose grief for his wife (who, in classic Victorian fashion, died during childbirth) permeates his interactions with his son and the performance of his job as a solicitor. He's given a last chance to excel when his employer sends him to Yorkshire to tie up the affairs of a deceased client, whose paperwork in her remote mansion, Eel Marsh House, is in complete disarray. Of course the manse - indeed, the entire village - is haunted, but Arthur's need to succeed at his task overrides any more instinctive desire to flee the premises.

Author Susan Hill has surely garnered tons of royalties from her novel, The Woman in Black, which was published in 1982. The story has been reworked as a TV movie, a radio series, a play, and now a feature film. Screenwriter Jane Goldman, whose credits include the action films Kick-Ass and X-Men: First Class, this time relies more on things that go bump in the night than straight-ahead exploits. Creaky sounds, chilling shrieks, and spooky footsteps are the stuff of this movie, while candlelit recesses, eerie figures glimpsed in peripheral vision, and the strange isolation of Eel Marsh House are their visual counterparts. The terrified villagers are tightlipped and aloof, and their children are kept locked away from strangers. James Watkins (Eden Lake) directs the gloomy activities with a sure hand, but Radcliffe, who appears in nearly every scene, never ignites onscreen. Perhaps he still seems too wet behind the ears to believably portray a grieving father, or maybe he just has too little to do here other than react speechlessly. The film is wonderfully atmospheric and full of little frights, but its overall impact is only glancing.



THE ADVENTURES OF TINTIN

The Adventures of Tintin is a cracking good adventure film. Add to that the photorealistic animation and the wickedly immersive 3-D, and you've got a huge holiday smash on your hands. What you don't have, however, is a great movie. The film is adapted from Belgian artist Hergé's long-running, French-language comic book series about Tintin, an intrepid young Belgian journalist with a penchant for stumbling into mysteries. Director Spielberg mines several Hergé stories to create a typically complex series of risky, slapsticky adventures for the young hero as he searches for an elusive treasure of pirate gold, among many other items of value. Tintin, despite his titular role, comes off as blandly heroic as a Eisenhower-era Boy Scout. But that's Tintin for you, and there's no changing him. ALBERT NOBBS

There's a priceless moment in this odd film wherein Brendan Gleeson, playing an alcoholic physician, turns to his hotel's servant, the singular Nobbs, and utters the classic male complaint: "Women." It's a hoot because, unbeknownst to Dr. Holloran, the titular Mr. Nobbs is in reality Miss Nobbs, splendidly played with repressed panic by a remarkable Glenn Close. Scripted from a short story by George Moore, this highly closeted film is set in Dublin, Ireland, in the late 19th century. Work is scarce. Thus Nobbs the feminine becomes Nobbs the masculine. Having eventually secured employment in a Dublin hotel, Nobbs' daily routine is one of ongoing self-obliteration. Close's vanishing act is so deep as to be cellular, and the role is certainly a memorable one. What the film may say to you about issues of gender, class, and identity depends entirely on what you bring to it. In the end, everything's a tragedy. (01/27/2012)

O THE ARTIST

Director Michel Hazanavicius' The Artist is an irresistible comic gem. It opens in 1927 when silent film star George Valentin (Dujardin) is the toast of all Hollywoodland. Utterly convinced that those newfangled talking pictures are just a fad, George's inability to rise to the challenge of speaking aloud (The Artist is silent except for a few inspired audio gags) provides much amusement and a certain bittersweet note in a film that glorifies the sheer imaginative heft of the silent era (the film is also shot in blackand-white). As George's producer (Goodman) badgers him to speak, the silent actor and his firecracker paramour, Peppy Miller (Bejo), are steadily forced apart by the advent of sound. What's so intensely pleasurable about The Artist is the endless parade of smartly creative and self-referential gags. CARNAGE

Adapted by Yasmina Reza and director Roman Polanski from Reza's hit play God of Carnage, this chamber piece will have you climbing the walls after 79 minutes with its faux-polite but distinctly fanged Brooklynite parents. After one boy grabs a stick and takes a mighty whack at another, their mothers and fathers meet for coffee and conciliation - neither Reza nor Polanski is a native English speaker, but they share an ear for the bafflegab of helicoptering parents - but soon enough the parents are picking up the metaphorical weapons of their sons. Carnage is a slight work, and the filmmakers' obvious disdain for the characters grows wearisome. Still, the script is chocka block with al dente amusements - obvious targets still make for wickedly funny one-liners - and the German actor Christophe Waltz is terrific as the only parent unburdened by decorum. The scenery may be thin, but Waltz chews it with wolfish abandon. (01/13/2012)

CONTRABAND

Although there's little that's new in this story about a man forced to pull one last smuggling job as everything that could go wrong does, Contraband stands out for its stylistic efficiency, stellar cast, and narrative restraint. As the character at the center of Contraband. Mark Walhberg is a stolid, believably stand-up guy who has abandoned his life of crime in favor of his family. Directed by Baltasar Kormákur, the star of the original Icelandic version of the film, Contraband is transposed to New Orleans. Wahlberg plays Chris Farraday, who is pulled back into the life after the brother (lones) of his wife (Beckinsale) screws up big time with local drug dealer Tim Briggs (Ribisi). When Farrady's wife and kids are threatened, the reformed criminal returns to the fray in order to protect them. A DANGEROUS METHOD

D: David Cronenberg; with Keira Knightley, Michael Fassbender, Viggo Mortensen, Vincent Cassel, Sarah Gadon. (R, 99 min.)

Canadian filmmaker David Cronenberg's period piece about the origins of psychoanalysis and the sexual confusions of its progenitors is eloquent and handsomely made, if never quite revelatory. The film opens with a Russian emigré named Sabina

(Knightlev) in howling, seizing distress, being taken against her will to a Zurich psychiatric hospital. She doesn't know it yet, but her life will in large part be defined by her shuttling between Zurich, the home of Carl Jung (Fassbender), her doctor and eventual lover, and Vienna, the home of Sigmund Freud (Mortensen), who once thought of Jung as his "son and heir." Sabina's influence loosens Jung from the rigors of Freud's strictly scientific method and nudges him toward a more speculative approach - the film positions her squarely at the center of Jung and Freud's famous break. It's a very particular film, one that takes some getting used to, but I was rather taken with it. (12/23/2011)

THE DESCENDANTS

Did anyone ever look less Hawaiian than the dapper and poised George Clooney? It serves his Descendants character Matt King well. Those constitutionally ill-fitting, loud prints and pleated shorts and boat shoes embody how out of touch Matt has become as a husband and a father to 10-year old Scottie (Miller) and 17-year-old Alex (Woodley). Voiceover opens the film and pops up occasionally, sometimes to describe the depths of the family's dysfunction. However, what we're told and what we're shown by director and co-writer Alexander Payne (Sideways, About Schmidt) don't always square: The girls seem more precociously rebellious than tyrannical, and Matt, who is publicly roasted for his failures as a family man, is never seen as anything less than a competent and loving caretaker. The Descendants is beautifully shot (by Phedon Papamichael) and compellingly performed, especially by its young stars, and it has moments of startling tenderness. If only it didn't feel phony to its bones. (11/25/2011)

THE DEVIL INSIDE

The Devil Inside offers proof that demons run rampant in Hollywood, possessing otherwise intelligent and creative people to make absolutely shitty "gotcha!" mocku-monstrosities like this one. Another faux found-footage film in the weak tradition of Paranormal Activity, The Devil Inside trades suburban creepiness for exorcisms gone wrong, Roman Catholic pageantry, and some extremely memorable and spine-wracking writhing courtesy of UK contortionist Pixie Le Knot. Andrade is Isabella Rossi, a tormented wraith of a woman whose mother (Crowley) went on a murderous, decidedly anti-Catholic rampage (possibly via demonic possession) when Isabella was a child. Twenty years later, with camera crew in tow, Isabella heads off to Italy to see her mother. Recruiting a pair of exorcists (Quarterman and Helmuth), Isabella does everything seasoned horror fans have come to expect, but with none of the panache. Chaos ensues, as does one of the most wrong-headed endings in horror film history Now that's just evil. (01/13/2012) - Marc Savlov

THE GIRL WITH THE **DRAGON TATTOO**

D: David Fincher; with Daniel Craig, Rooney Mara, Christopher Plummer, Robin Wright, Stellan Skarsgård, Steven Berkoff, Tony Way, Joely Richardson, Geraldine James. (R, 158 min.)

Rooney Mara nails it, completely. That was the big question regarding David Fincher's (slightly) Americanized adaptation of Stieg Larsson's sensational Millennium trilogy, originally adapted for the Swedish screen in 2009. This second incarnation of Lisbeth Salander - punk-rock privateer, hacker-sleuth, damaged goods - is every bit as unnerving and hypnotic. Sometimes even more so. The screenplay includes a handful of deviations from the Swedish version, but the main thing that establishes this as the superior film is Fincher's exacting directorial aesthetic. Investigating the decades-old murder of the favorite niece of industrialist Henrik Vanger (Plummer), Daniel Craig's damaged journalist crusader Mikael Blomkvist prowls around the snowbound Vanger estate, as bad things – and bodies – begin to pile up. What transfixes here isn't the labyrinthine plotting but Mara's Lisbeth, It's a knockout sucker punch of a performance. Mara's doomy gaze cuts through the hype and bores straight into your soul. HAYWIRE

Is Steven Soderbergh still planning on quitting the movies to focus on his painting? If so, this may be your last chance to catch the director in full-blown action/thriller mode. Haywire is a technically exemplary but otherwise unremarkable piece of fisticuffs filmmaking keyed to Soderbergh's particularly brutal vision of onscreen physicality. Famed mixed martial artist and former American Gladiator Gina Carano is Mallory Kane, a globe-trotting government contractor (i.e. ultrabadass femme fatale assassin) who finds herself the victim of a double-cross. Unsure who to trust, Kane wields both her omnipresent guns and her body as fluidly as any ballerina. Surrounded by professional actors of the highest caliber, Carano acquits herself admirably, but the storyline eventually feels like a pretty weak excuse to hang a halfdozen action set-pieces from. In the process, Scorsese also schools other filmmakers and viewers in the use of 3-D as a potential enhancement to the art of storytelling rather than its contemporary bastardization as a requisite gewgaw. Hugo is perhaps not a story for the youngest of children but should work just fine for older kids, adolescents, and grown-ups. Robert Richardson's cinematography is most impressive. In fact, Scorsese's entire crew functions at the top of its game here. Although a nip and a tuck might improve the film's overall pace, there is no denying that this love letter to the movies is something to cherish. We see her early days as the daughter of a hard-working Lincolnshire grocer; as a young woman (Roach), fresh from Oxford and trying to break into politics; squired by a perpetually bemused Denis (Lloyd), whom she eventually marries; and, finally, ascension to a Conservative seat in Parliament, with her career culminating in her historic premiership. Toothsome material, to be sure, but The Iron Lady, as directed by Mamma Mia!'s Phyllida Lloyd, has all the heft of a fictionalized This Is Your Life, thick with rah-rah bromides and talk of (egads!) Thatcher's feelings. The film still entertains, but that has everything to do with Meryl Streep's dynamic incarnation of Thatcher from middle age on. Pastor Dale (Vance) appoints Vi Rose Hill (Queen Latifah) the new choirmaster, ruffling Bernard's widow, and rival diva, G.G. (Dolly Parton). The grande dames, however, are largely upstaged by the movie's younger generation, setting up an ongoing tension between 'traditional" choir music and a more contemporary repertoire. Joyful Noise, while set in the world of gospel music, soft-pedals religiosity in favor of downhome country aphorisms and expressions. The interracial aspect is a nonfactor, as is any display of real emotional strife of any sort. The film feels about as genuine and spontaneous as its evident lip-synching. (01/13/2012)

Tasked with penetrating the Kremlin, Hunt gets more than his share of disguises, gizmos, and falls from high places. Director Bird's vision brings much to the table, but the film's gee-whiz/oh-fuck gadgetry and stunning vistas left me with the feeling I've seen much of this before. Red Tails is both a stirring and simplistic tribute to the men that shattered the U.S. Army Air Corps' racial barrier, while saving lives and downing countless numbers of Hitler's formidable Luftwaffe. Although famously based on the airmen's real-life exploits, Red Tails is pure wartime hokum. Squadron leader and secret boozer "Easy" (Parker) and his wingman/best pal "Lightning" (Oyelowo) are saddled with fervently dopey dialogue, and it all seems less shell-shocked than shellacked. But ... if you're a 13-year-old boy (or if your inner one is still kicking), then the magnificently choreographed aerial battles in Red Tails will have you walking on air, at least for a little while. The kempt escorts with whom he politely negotiates terms, the workaday masturbation breaks, the foot-fidgeting: This is Brandon's everyday landscape. But soon Brandon's routine is upended by the sudden arrival of his needy, chancy younger sister, Sissy (Carey Mulligan). Where Brandon is ordered and emotionally closed off, Sissy is erratic, fairly lunging at any warm body that might warm her back. Indeterminate damage has been done to them both, and whatever it was, it has steered the course of all future emotional and physical entanglements, including the siblings' own provocative push-pull. Director Steve McQueen has stripped all fat from this dark, obsessively stylized story about sex addiction. Smiley is forced into early retirement at the film's outset, but ministry officials soon drag him back into the fray to investigate rumors of a Soviet mole burrowed deep in the SIS; the title, taken from a British nursery rhyme, is the shorthand for the suspect list devised by Smiley's former mentor, the cryptically named Control (Hurt). What a delectably tense-making game of Whac-a-Mole it all turns out to be. Where Alfredson's Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy bobbles is on the plotting level. UNDERWORLD: AWAKENING

Perhaps the producers felt the Underworld franchise had gorged on its elaborate mythology of Lycans and vampire elders in the last film, 2009's origin story *Underworld: Rise of the Lycans*. If so, Underworld: Awakening wildly overcorrects itself, shearing almost all substance, suspense, even dialogue from what was, at first bite, a kicky Goth romp. Series lead Kate Beckinsale returns as vampire Selene, still wearing skintight black leather like nobody's business. Humans have finally caught on that Lycans and vampires live among them, and both species are now being hunted to near extinction. Selene attempts to flee, but nefarious forces give chase, and after a blackout, Selene wakes 12 years later, in a research facility, and hopping mad. Underworld: Awakening is squishy with gore, yes, but rather starved of topics of interest. WAR HORSE

War Horse is spectacularly gorgeous to look at but skimps on dramatic pull. Raised on an English farm, Joey is sold into war in 1914 and has many a harrowing experience on the Western front. A horse is a horse (of course, of course), and it might be said that the folly of War Horse is its expectation of emotional resonance to derive from a fairly expressionless equine visage. The film's visual style is a throwback to classic studio movies: epic in composition and drenched in widescreen vistas. The battle scenes, despite being bloodless, are powerfully wrenching and a keen reminder of what Spielberg is capable of. 

No Idea Festival

For nine years, the No Idea Festival has coaxed out some of the most memorable experimental and fringe live performances in town.

Clutching tight the Austin scene's outré luminaries like electronics artist Rick Reed and percussionists Nick Hennies and Chris Cogburn - the latter two best known for innovating what it means to be a "drummer" in a performance setting - No Idea joins these locals with other far-flung artists reaching into the unknown. Performers this year are culled from Berlin (Andrea Neumann), Boston (Greg Kelley), and New Orleans (Bhob Rainey), and will include a diverse group of New Yorkers, including dancer Maggie Bennett. electronics artist Bryan Eubanks, and Gill Arno. who works with media including "amplified slide projectors."

The festival this year actually takes place in three leaps between Austin, Houston, and San Antonio, but Eastside hangout the Broken Neck

is the first venue landing. Having begun Monday, Jan. 30, and running through Saturday, Feb. 4, Cogburn and Bennett have designed a piece called "Individual Artistic Practice as Curatorial Conversation," a free openprocess work that will envelop many of the visiting and local No Idea acts. Thursday, Cogburn, Bennett, Baltimore's Bonnie Jones, and Arnò perform it, followed by a vibraphone and ensemble composition from Nick Hennies "written especially for this year's festival." Friday and Saturday domino four individual music sets each from almost a dozen musicians, the latter augmented by a workshop, Unusual Ear: Making Music With Improvised, Acoustic and Electronic Sounds, 2-4pm at the 29th Street Ballroom. Patience is a virtue when experiencing performances that slowly unspool at a pace often unknown even to the makers, but the expectation that anything can emerge from the stage - be it a sound, idea, or movement - makes this type of improvisational/experimental bounty worth your time. And as if to closer align itself with the conventiondashing tradition of punk and other extreme music, the setting for this year's No Idea Festival isn't the wonderful Salvage Vanguard Theater, but rather converted warehouse space the Broken Neck, a venue better known for its raucous late-night performances, graffiti, and a general unbridled dinginess that will offset the academic whiff high-profile experimental music often exhales. - Adam Schragin

Now in its second decade, Ed Hall-spawned sextet Pong continues enlivening the genteel with danceable electro-rock paeans to oddball dystopia. John Hawkins' pre-Crust combo Talmadge D'Amour crosses unvarnished synth-pop with a creeping sense of doom, while fellow Crust-mate Richard Smith's Bipolar Gentlemen is a gothic-industrial swirl of psychoactive guitar jags, percussive thunder, and 45 Grave-style vocals.

Red Bank, N.J., remains notable only/mostly as the birthplace of Monster Magnet, whose South by Southwest Thunderdome in 1995 for *Dopes to Infinity* boomed atomic. Three of Red Bank's Monster crew triangulate Riotgod, a conflagration of 1990s operatic metal (Queensrÿche, Skid Row) and 1970s UK proto-black metal (Angel Witch?) on the quartet's debut, *Invisible Empire*. Paired with the Charger stomp of locals Dixie Witch, with support from Modok and Bay of Pigs, Riotgod hopefully calls for tear gas.
