## **CARS MUCH MORE DANGEROUS**

You recently wrote, "Blasé and entitled auto drivers are just as much a public threat as cyclists who run stop signs, stealthily sidle past rows of waiting cars, and don't use their damn hand



signals" [Best at Safely Gesticulating, "Best of Austin," Nov. 9]. Not! The truth is that cars are actually a much larger threat to public safety than bicycles are or ever could be. Think about it: Of the 320 cases of failure to stop and render aid in Austin so far this year, or the dozens of deaths of innocent road users on Austin streets, exactly how many do you think were caused by bicyclists? (Hint: zero.) And how many were caused by drivers? All of them! Law-breaking drivers cause about 30,000 wrecks in the Austin area each year, and in about half of those cases, a vehicle is towed away or someone goes to the hospital. Nationally, drivers running red lights kill about a thousand people annually and injure another quarter-million.

Both drivers and cyclists break the law, but the difference is that the drivers are the ones actually killing people. Chronicle, drivers aren't "just as much a threat" as cyclists "who don't

use their damn hand signals." They're a fantastically bigger threat. When you're out driving around, which would be worse: getting T-boned by an SUV or by a Schwinn?

What happens going forward is dependent on who organizes to use the new system, whether they're home builders, environmentalists, etc.

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

# Voting picture suggests the next Austin politics

I was wrong last week when I speculated that the city Proposition 15 - affordable housing bonds - failed because the ballot language was so vague that voters didn't know what it was. "I'll venture a wild guess and suggest," I wrote the day after the

election, that "the ballot language - '78.3 million for housing bonds' and nothing more - was simply too imprecise and inexplicable for voters considering the bottom of a lengthy November ballot." Since the vote was so close (51.4% to 48.6%, about 7,000 votes of 235,000 cast) that's probably part of the explanation – just adding the word "affordable" to the ballot could

have made the difference.

But since I wrote that column, I've looked at the maps. City demographer Ryan Robinson offers his breakdowns of several of the proposition votes across the city and county. Amy Smith has more to say today about the details of the affordable housing fumble

("Then There's This," p. 12), so I won't pursue it here. But in looking at Robinson's Prop. 15 map (see it with this column at austinchronicle.com), it struck me that he had perhaps delivered a snapshot of the city's political future. Nearly all the central

> city boxes - from U.S. 183 south to Ben White and beyond, and from MoPac on the west to

the East and Southeast Austin boxes - voted for the housing bonds, most by above 60%. But farther west, beginning at MoPac and running northwest and southwest as well as some patches far north and far south, the percentages swung hard the other way. Most folks there voted approximately 60% against the bond.

That's not a scientific analysis - I'm looking only at percentage shadings, not numerical counts - so a better number cruncher than me would have to review those patterns to see what boxes and neighborhoods actually turned the tide against Prop. 15. But simple "ignorance" would be more random. This pattern - of voters further and further into the suburbs balking at underwriting housing bonds (while supporting roads, open space, infrastructure, public safety, libraries, even arts) while inner-city voters endorsed the bonds enthusiastically - argues for folks recognizing the choice, and breaking roughly in half.

# Millions for Health, **Nothing for Housing**

The outcome seems also remarkable in light of the easy victory of the Central Health Prop. 1, which took in the whole county, some 340,000 voters, and won easily with nearly 55% of the vote. One would think a countywide ballot would trend more anti-tax, especially when the opposition kept citing a "huge 63% tax increase" continued on p.12

# Headlines

- > Start your engines or close the curtains. The inaugural United States Grand Prix at the Circuit of the Americas takes place this weekend, with an estimated 300,000 attendees expected across the three-day race weekend. See coverage starting on p.24.
- The Confederacy has found the Internet! A petition on the White House website, asking fo Texas to be given independence, has gained more than 30,000 signatures and therefore must get a response from the president (we're expecting it will be "no"). A rival petition, asking for Austin to be allowed to secede back into the U.S., is also up on the website, as is a petition seeking to deport all persons signing petitions to secede. See www.whitehouse.gov/petitions.
- Speaking of crazies, the Westboro Baptists the fringe church that pickets the funerals of gay Americans and soldiers – have announced they will be protesting at Formula One this weekend because "Bible-ignorant fools worship these race car drivers like they are little gods!"
- > City Council meets Monday, Nov. 19, but only to canvass last week's election results - no regular meeting again until Dec. 6 (work session Dec. 4). For a brief report on last week's helicoptering, see "Council: As the Copter Spins," p.16.
- State lawmakers started pre-filing bills on Nov. 12 for the 83rd legislative session. So far, filing has been slow: only 124 Senate bills and 168 from the House in the first full day. Many, including a slew of bills on texting while driving, are bills that failed last session. We're particularly intrigued by a bill by Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, proposing mandatory drug testing for housing and unemployment benefit applicants.
- Former USA Today General Manager Susie Ellwood has been announced as the new publisher of the Austin American-Statesman, replacing Jane Williams, Ellwood has a reputation for tough management practices like unpaid employ ee furloughs, which could be bad news for Statesman staff who have already seen their ranks depleted by layoffs and centralization.
- > Fans, football players, and old rivals gathered at the Frank Erwin Center on Nov. 13 to celebrate the life and achievements of Longhorn coach Darrell K Royal, who died last week aged 88.
- > After two months' reprieve, a burn ban is back in effect in Travis County as of Nov. 13 (through Dec. 12). The Fire Marshal's Office warns residents especially about the risks of operating machinery near dry plants and tossing cigarette butts out car windows. Barbecuing is still allowed as long as it's in a closeable or lidded grill.
- Arbor Terrace, a new housing community for low-income (less than \$27,000 per year) adults including veterans and the homeless, was dedicated Wednesday morning. The \$10.7 million community is off I-35 between Woodward and Oltorf, and plans include 120 efficiency apartments and substantive support services for residents, such as employment readiness and money management classes.

(because the current rate is so low); and persuading 100,000 additional voters should be, in theory at least, more difficult.

The basic map pattern for Prop. 1 is roughly the same as Prop. 15: The inner-city boxes voted strongly in support, but the farther one gets from the central city, support drops first below 50% and then into 30-45% nether regions – although many of those are sparsely populated precincts.

Prop. 1 had much better PR and certainly way more money to work with than Prop. 15 (indeed, than all of the city bond propositions put together), so people understood what they were voting on and could see countywide and regional benefits. The folks promoting Prop. 15 did too little too late in getting out that kind of message, and narrowly missed their target. So, despite all the persistent talk of "loss of affordability" in lamentations about the new Austin, we couldn't see our way this time to help those most in need of that help.

It was many of the folks in the wealthiest western suburbs who pointed thumbs down.

## **Brave New World**

So we enter the new dispensation of all-geographic districts, the sainted "10-1." That's what struck me most forcibly about the maps – there are fairly clear lines around our neighborhood political opinions, and the new political map may well upend many expectations about who votes how and where. A few days before the election, Steve Beers posted a thoughtful piece in Burnt Orange Report about city voting patterns, and he came out strongly in support of Prop. 4 (the "hybrid" system) because he believed it represented a much better chance of sustaining progressive politics – especially on environmental matters.

To put it another way, those far west districts are more likely to look like the Travis County Precinct 3 vote – where Gerald "Road Warrior" Daugherty defeated incumbent and environmental advocate Karen Huber in a campaign that consisted almost exclusively of roads, roads, and more roads. If Daugherty-like politicians begin accumulating on one side of the City Council dais, opposite, say, Eastside neighborhood advocates whose priorities might be affordability and social services, it may well be that the entertainment value of most Council meetings will extend beyond Citizens Communications.

It's something to contemplate. Austin has finally and simply grown too large for an all at-large government, in which seven people were expected to represent all of the people, all of the time. I confess I'm puzzled that folks suddenly willing to pay for three more council members, and a spanking new medical program, were not willing to pay for programs to repair decrepit housing for elderly neighbors, or to provide partly subsidized apartments for working families earning minimum wages.

Maybe next time we'll get that ballot language right. And we'll explore a Brave New City, that has such a motley crew of council members henceforth calling the shots.

# DEFEAT OF PROPOSITION 15 POSES NEW CHALLENGES FOR CITY'S AFFORDABILITY GOALS

"I hope you don't scold the electorate," housing advocate **Frances Ferguson** said, trying to strike a positive note as she summed up last week's ballot rejection of a \$78.3 million **affordable housing** bond proposal. The disappointing loss – it was the only one of seven city bond propositions to fail – was a stunning reversal of the overwhelming support voters gave housing in the November 2006 bond election in a nonpresidential election year.

Ferguson, board president of nonprofit **HousingWorks Austin**, is much more forgiving of the 51% of voters who nixed **Proposition 15** than some folks are. Most of the negative votes were cast by people who live west of MoPac and areas far north and far south, while the majority of yes votes came from Central and East Austin.

(Put another way, the voters who struck down housing were the same ones who heavily favored a new form of

True, calling Prop. 15
naysayers "heartless
bastards" is counterproductive to the

cause, but a narrow, 2%
loss is tough to accept,
given that it means the virtual undoing of a program
that would have provided funding

for housing repairs for elderly homeowners, built a few thousand apartments and homes for low-income families, and provided permanent supportive housing services for veterans and individuals with disabilities. "Heartless bastards" sounds about right when one considers all the worthy projects that cratered as a result of this outcome.

Getting back to Ferguson's attempts to steer the conversation away from blaming voters, housing advocates have already begun to restrategize their community outreach efforts beyond Austin's central core before the next bond election, possibly in 2014. That, too, could be a daunting task with a governor's race on the ballot, along with the first City Council election under the 10-1 system.

Additionally, advocacy leaders are working with city officials who have vowed to try to find other sources of funding – not \$78 million, obviously, but enough seed money perhaps to move some projects off the starting block. Affordability, after all, is a community value that every member of the City Council has committed to uphold.

#### **'WE'RE WISER NOW'**

Without question, there were a number of factors that contributed to the housing proposal's collapse at the polls. Extremely vague ballot language was cited as a big blow, but it was certainly not the main rea-

son for the loss. "When we saw the ballot language, we basically flipped," said **Mark Yznaga**.

Also, the campaign was
low on resources and slow
to get its message out; the
ballot was unusually long; and

there was an anti-tax effort afoot, although that opposition was primarily targeting the well-financed **medical school** campaign. Finally, persistent concerns about the economy were evident in polling data on all the bond propositions.

Those challenges proved insurmountable, but Ferguson views the defeat as an opportunity for growth. "Frankly, if you stand back and look at this, you realize that while we lost, we learned a lot," she said. "We need to do a better job of getting our message out. It was up to us to do more."

Perhaps the biggest obstacle facing the campaign was the lack of voter knowledge

about affordable housing as a community benefit rather than a detriment. Moreover, a housing bond proposal is a fairly new concept for city voters more familiar with breadand-butter propositions like roads, parks, and libraries. "This was only our second rodeo," said Ferguson. "We're wiser now."

Clearly, the political and economic landscapes have shifted dramatically since the city's first housing bond election in 2006. At that time, there wasn't a presidential election, the economy hadn't crashed yet, and there wasn't a new police crackdown on homeless individuals Downtown, which the police chief announced just as early voting was kicking off.

## WHAT THE CAMPAIGN KNEW

While the ballot drubbing may have shocked many supporters, people within the campaign knew Prop. 15 was in trouble early on. Polling data showed it was the least favored of the seven bond proposals, and the least likely to pass. Three automated phone polls by consultant **Mark Little-field** provided a fairly accurate picture of what the returns would show.

"There was an assumption on the part of some people that housing would pass," said campaign strategist **David Butts**, who worked on the campaign. "None of the polling that we saw showed it winning. It showed us losing months ago, and it was losing starting in early October."

Campaign contributions started to pick up in mid-to-late October, with development groups **Stratus Properties** and **Spring Austin Partners** each kicking in \$10,000. The campaign scraped together enough money to pay for a modest TV advertising buy, but by then early voting was halfway over. Campaign staffers suspected they had lost the early vote and had hoped to close the gap on Election Day. But those voters were either no-shows or didn't make their way down the entire ballot.

Even with all the negative factors working against a victory for Prop. 15, Yznaga summed up the loss in a few words: "We should have done a better job."

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# **New Direction for New AISD Board?**

As the Austin Independent School District board of **trustees** prepares to swear in its new members, voters who backed a major switch in direction will see how much change they can really create.

Four new members - At-Large Place 8 member Gina Hinojosa, the Rev. Jayme Mathias in District 2, Ann Teich in District 3, and Amber Elenz in District 5 - will join the

board Nov. 19. Their prime task may be to restore faith in the district. During the election, the consensus among all candidates was that AISD is terrible at community outreach. It doesn't help that it's almost impossible to get hold of the current trustees: The only way to reach most of them is through voicemail at the board offices or a single email address (trustees@austinisd.org). Board meetings - all held at the Carruth Administration Center - have been criticized for being difficult for parents and stakeholders to attend, let alone be heard. With only an hour of citizens communication, slots on

controversial issues can go fast. Outgoing board President Mark Williams has sparred openly with employees union Education Austin when he refused to let people grant their time to other speakers - a common practice at City Council. Trustees have also been without access to in-house legal advice since longtime general counsel Mel Waxler quit his post to become Superintendent Meria Carstarphen's chief of staff in June. The district hasn't filled his position, and the board has depended on pricey external lawyers for legal advice ever since.

The first and most important job for the new board will be selecting a new president. With Williams exiting, two veteran members are being eyed for runs. District 4's Vincent Torres has been quietly supportive of Carstarphen and less of a swing vote than expected over the last two years. However, Robert Schneider in District 6 has become a champion for Carstarphen's critics, regularly challenging

her for what he sees as unresponsiveness. If both prove to be too divisive for the board, then the short list for a consensus candidate would be short indeed.

So how much of a mandate did the new board receive to rewrite the rules? On election night, Teich romped easily past incumbent Christine Brister, who had suspended her campaign and seemed undecided whether she would serve again even if re-elected. The worst defeat of the night went to the candidate perceived as being closest to Carstarphen and the current administration, and it came citywide:

Hinojosa beat Mary Ellen Pietruszynski 69% to 31% in the Place 8 race. Pietruszynski only won one significant box: precinct 247 in West Austin. Generally, she trailed Hinojosa by double digits almost everywhere, and by as much as 65% in East Austin's precinct 152.

So far, there seem to be few tears spilled that Elenz beat out Charlie Jackson to represent West Austin. The consensus was that both were good candidates in very different ways -Jackson came with social justice credentials, but Elenz had much deeper roots in the community. Ultimately, Jackson

> only took one box - precinct 325, which had only nine total votes cast - and Elenz won in a landslide. However, even though she came in with Williams' seal of approval, Elenz represents a District 5 significantly different from the one he held, having lost chunks of the center city in redistricting, and going out much deeper into the Southwest suburbs.

> The closest battle, and possibly the clearest sign of a divided community, came when Mathias - powered by popular discontent over the deal with IDEA Public Schools squeaked past Sam Guzmán. It was a narrow, 1% win, and a late start in campaigning

may have crippled Guzmán's chances of holding his seat. Mathias was ahead by 5% in early voting, but Guzmán had a remarkable surge on Election Day, biting into Mathias' lead in some precincts by as much as 12 percentage points. Guzmán's supporters may take solace that they could make so much headway so late in the game; on the other hand, there'll be a lot of headshaking over how Mathias - a gay, white, excommunicated former Roman Catholic priest could even get within challenger distance of an establishment Hispanic candidate like Guzmán. - Richard Whittaker











# **Council: As the Copter Spins**

The next time somebody wants to ferry tourists by helicopter across the Austin skyline, it ain't gonna be so easy.

That is the gist of an ordinance passed last Thursday by **City Council**, a response to **temporary helipads** now officially authorized to fly passengers to and from this week's **Formula One** events. Residents of the **Barton Hills** neighborhood were alarmed to learn through news reports that during the three days of events at the Circuit of the Americas, a helipad would be installed atop a parking garage at the Barton Oaks Plaza complex, near the intersection of MoPac and Bee Caves Road. (Another apparently less controversial site will be atop the Embassy Suites at 300 S. Congress.)

Under the ordinance passed on an emergency basis last week – although too late to affect this week's operations – any temporary helipads will henceforth be limited to 18 flights a day (the MoPac helipad is

expecting as many as 46 round-trips this weekend) while city staff gathers stakeholder input and comes back to council with recommendations for a revised ordinance. This week's operations had been approved Wednesday by Aviation Director **Jim Smith**, acting under his authority granted by the current law, and Smith told the council that the operators had complied with both FAA regulations and current city standards. (That didn't stop at least one neighborhood activist, **Robert Corbin**, from demanding Smith's termination.)

Melissa Hawthorne, president of the Barton Hills Neighborhood Association, described the situation as "small town, big city blues," and said that while the NA is not opposed to Formula One, residents are concerned that they had not been notified in advance of the proposed helipads (apparently under consideration since April) and there had been no opportunity for public input.

"We're good neighbors, and we're good hosts," Hawthorne said, referring to large public events like Austin City Limits Festival, adding that the NA should have been included in the process.

Hawthorne's remarks were echoed by other speakers (among them **Cyndi Collen** of the Bouldin Creek NA) and amplified by **David Alsmeyer** of TIG Real Estate, who said his business tenants at the Plaza were also alarmed by the prospect of disruption of their operations.

The ordinance was sponsored by Council Members Laura Morrison and Kathie Tovo. Morrison said the city faces a potential "tipping point" of antagonism to tourism, and, "We're not going to let tourism drive our city past the tipping point." Tovo said the schedule of flights this weekend is "far out of scale with what is reasonable." The proposed ordinance will in principle require applicants to go through the "conditional use" process before the **Planning Commission**, and for any events in the meantime, the 18-trip limit will be in force. Only Mayor Lee Leffingwell objected to the interim trip limits, saying the numbers were "pulled out of the air ... out of panic and thoughtlessness I can't support."

Council also approved a dozen annexations, including the COTA tract (although staff is still working on an emergency response cooperation agreement with **Emergency Service District 11**), and (on first reading only, and over the developer's objections) a development-in-the-making near I-35 and Onion Creek Parkway. It also approved the legislative agenda for the city's liaison team and heard two hours of discussion of the

**East Riverside Corridor Regulating Plan**, but took no action; a sticking point for the mixed-use plan is how flexible to be about drive-through installations, one of the issues to be taken up at the next meeting.

Council meets Monday, Nov. 19, but only for the ritual of canvassing the city election results; the next regular meeting isn't until Dec. 6 (work session Dec. 4). - Michael King

# Cap Metro Crisis

By the time you read this, Amalgamated Transit Union Local 1091 - which represents about 600 drivers and mechanics who drive buses for Capital Metro via Fort Worth-based subcontractor McDonald Transit - may be out on strike. Earlier this week, ATU 1091 President Jay Wyatt told the Chronicle that negotiations with McDonald had come to a standstill, and in his words: "We learned years ago, that if you're talking to a wall, you don't expect a response from a wall. So we just quit talking to the wall." Union members voted to authorize a strike last week (see "Fiscal Cliff? Try Cap Metro Cliff," Newsdesk blog, Nov. 9), and Wyatt said Monday: "We have no choice. [A strike] will happen some time this week." He blamed management – and most specifically Capital Metro, not a direct party to the negotiations - for setting the strategy and planning to force a strike.

**Capital Metro** spokesman **Dan** Dawson denied the agency has any interest in a strike - "Oh my goodness, heavens no!" were his exact words but said the agency was preparing for any contingency, with drivers drawn from other contractors or ATU members who decide not to strike. McDonald Transit **Managing Director** 

John Bartosiewicz said Tuesday that more bargaining sessions are scheduled for next week, and that he was surprised by Wyatt's statements. "Any talk of a strike I would consider premature," Bartosiewicz said, "as negotiations are continuing."


Late Tuesday, Wyatt said the situation had not changed, but no strike decision had yet been made. Check the Newsdesk blog for updates. - M.K.



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# 'Landmark' Lawsuit Rises **Again: 'Broken Promise'**

Dominic Chavez, Michael Levy, and Ed Wendler Jr. are not about to surrender. Their lawsuit against the city (and now Travis County and the Austin Independent School District) over the historic landmark tax abatement program is back and apparently this time, they're not backing down.

According to the three plaintiffs' lawyer, Jim George, historic tax abatements exist for one reason – to help homeowners rehab and maintain threatened historic homes. So Chavez, Levy, and Wendler are not fond of Austin's interpretation of the state statute, under which the city routinely grants tax abatement to homes and buildings that are in excellent condition.

"There are millionaires who claim they can't afford to restore houses that they've already restored," said George. "Everybody else is paying to let these people have subsidized housing."

The lawsuit is nothing new. In fact, about a year ago, the plaintiffs came to an agreement with the city over this same policy. At the time, George said that he and his clients understood that the city would make individual assessments of taxpayers and their homes and evaluate the real need for restoration abatement. Instead, says George, "They haven't factored in the need at all."

Historic Preservation Officer Steve Sadowsky disagrees. Homeowners "have to provide an affidavit now. That's a result of the last lawsuit," he said. The affidavit, which follows the tax

code, asks owners to affirm that there is a need for an exemption. However, Sadowsky said he didn't know whether any abatement had been denied because the cited need was unconvincing.


In fact, city officials told the Austin American-Statesman last month that they had never denied tax breaks to historic property owners who maintain their properties according to city preservation rules, making the historic zoning cases the real determination of who gets a tax abatement. AISD (the biggest tax bite) and Travis County also grant tax exemptions, but with no preservation offices of their own, they have traditionally relied on the city to determine merit.

In the past year, there have been historiczoning cases that have certainly chipped away at any faith the city was taking a needs-based evaluation of tax abatement seriously. In March, City Council approved Historic Landmark status for a meticulously maintained West Austin estate valued at just under \$2 million. All told, tax abatement on the property from the city, school district, and county totals about \$20,000 a year.

And during the summer, the Historic Landmark Commission voted unanimously in favor of historic zoning for the Westgate Tower - a 1966 solid block of a building at 12th and Colorado that obstructed the view of the Capitol for many Westsiders - thus inspiring State Capitol View Corridors legislation that restricts similar view-blocking high-rises. The notion that this \$34 million apartment building (home to Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, among other high-rolling insiders) needed a tax abatement had those opposed to the program (and some sympathetic to it) nearly apoplectic. Because the building is divided into indi-

vidually owned condos. tax abatement would apply to each residence separately. Facing public pressure, the applicants withdrew their case in advance of a visit to the Planning Commission, despite staff recommendations and support from the Historic Landmark Commission

**Heritage Society of** Austin Executive Director Jacqui Schraad says the abatement exists to compensate property owners for their loss of development rights. She also points out that other tax exemptions offered by the city do not require a demonstration of need. "It's very expensive to keep these properties up, and they've given up all




'We would see potential for a lot of loss if these abatements went away," she continued.

Responded George: "I would like the city of Austin to follow the state statute like everyone else in the state of Texas. Texas has a history of not encouraging tax subsidies."

Schraad doesn't think that's a lead the city should be following. "I don't know if we necessarily want to become Houston and Dallas," she said.

George said he and his clients are not inclined to reach another settlement with the city. "They don't seem to have kept their promise. It's kind of like if a boy calls you up, asks you on a date, and stands you up," he said. "You don't take a date the - Elizabeth Pagano second time."



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
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# 'An Agency Run Amok': State Keeps Planned Parenthood in Limbo

Travis County District Judge Stephen Yelenosky on Nov. 8 granted a temporary injunction barring the state from enforcing a rule that would keep Planned Parenthood from participating in the Women's Health Program until a trial on the merits of the case can be held in December. The nonprofit, he wrote in a letter to both parties, is "likely to prevail on their claim that the rule is inconsistent" with the will of Texas lawmakers. In response, Attorney General **Greg Abbott** immediately issued a notice of appeal, which lifts the injunction until the 3rd Court of Appeals weighs in. Yelenosky's ruling, the state alleges, "incorrectly halts implementation of State law," Lauren Bean, Abbott's deputy communications director, said in a statement.

At issue is a rule defining who may provide services under the WHP, a Medicaidwaiver program that provides family planning and basic health services to low-income and uninsured women who wouldn't be eligible for Medicaid unless pregnant. It also aims to reduce the number of unplanned pregnancies in Texas, where more than half of all pregnancies are paid for by Medicaid, to the tune of \$2.9 billion in 2009. It is undisputed that the program has saved the state millions, with the federal government paying 90% of the nearly \$36 million annual cost for services.

Despite the program's ongoing success, the state last year undertook to rewrite the program rules in order to ban PP from participation. Across the state, 26 PP clinics provide services to nearly 50,000 clients. In recasting the rules, state health officials sought to kick PP out of the program because some PP clinics in the state use

private funds to provide abortion care. None of the PP clinics involved in the WHP provide abortion services; indeed, abortion is not covered by the WHP, and pregnant women aren't eligible for WHP services.

The state's decision to ban PP prompted the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services to tell the state that it would no longer be able to fund the WHP because the ban on PP would violate federal law that guarantees women access to the family planning provider of their choice. (In a Nov. 7 letter, CMS Director Cindy Mann reiterated the federal government's position: "We have made clear that we would have been willing to continue to provide full federal funding for WHP as long as Texas refrained from implementing a rule that is inconsistent with these legal requirements.")

In response, Gov. Rick Perry said earlier this year that the state would forgo federal funding and come up with the money to pay for the program so it could keep the ban on PP's participation; Health and Human Services Executive Commissioner Dr. Kyle Janek said last month that the program would be ready for implementation in November.

PP earlier this year sued in federal court, arguing that the new rule violates free speech and association and due process rights; the district court agreed, but the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in August overturned that decision. Late last month, PP took the fight to state court, arguing that the ban actually violates state law: Yelenosky agreed that PP was likely to prevail and issued the injunction Nov. 8 after a severalhours-long hearing.

PP lawyers Mike McKetta and Pete Schenkkan argued to Yelenosky that Chap-

ter 32 of Texas' Human Resources Code specifically renders "inoperable" any provision – like the new WHP rules – that causes the state to lose federal funding for any medical assistance program. The decision to overrule or rewrite that specific provision lies with state lawmakers, not with the executive branch or with health department bureaucrats. "The purpose is to get all the benefits [Texas] can" from federal coffers, McKetta said. And the inoperability section expresses "emphatic legislative intent: If something gets in the way [of collecting federal funds], that section is inoperable," he continued. "Unless the Legislature in 2013 says we no longer care about getting federal money. That's up to them to do. It's not up to Governor Perry or Dr. Janek or state health officials."

The new rule was made without any "reasoned justification" - which would be required - and specifically to oust PP, without any regard to the basic program goals of expanding access to health care for women in need and reducing the number of unplanned pregnancies. "The evidence shows [the state is] abandoning access for tens of thousands of people - and they've never given a reasoned justification about how" the new rule would further a state goal, McKetta said. Instead, he said the change was made "by an agency run amok; it did something without legislative authority," and something state law specifically tells them not to do.

The state disagrees, arguing that the executive branch of state government has the power to decide which Medicaid-funded programs the state should participate in, meaning that it doesn't have to participate in a federally supported WHP and may choose to go its own way with a state-funded, PP-banning program if Perry or Janek decides that's the way to go. The Legislature "can put out the parameters to be considered" in what federally funded programs should be pursued, Texas Assistant Solicitor General Kristofer Monson told Yelenosky, but "at some point the executive [power] has to mean something."

Monson also argued that even if the inoperability clause is relevant, the federal government doesn't actually have the authority to deny the state Medicaid funds for the WHP. Whether the new Texas rules actually violate federal law is up to the federal courts to determine, Monson said, noting that a federal suit challenging the CMS decision to defund the program is pending in federal court in Waco. In that suit, the state argues that federal law only allows Medicaid recipients to obtain services from "qualified" providers; because the state has determined that PP is not qualified to participate in the WHP, that should mean that they're not eligible for Medicaid funds passed back to the state. So far that argument has not been persuasive to federal jurists; the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals last month rejected a similar argument from Indiana, which was also seeking to deny Medicaid funding to PP clinics there.

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
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
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

# State on Track To Execute Its 15th in 2012

At press time, the state was readying to carry out the Nov. 15 execution of **Preston Hughes III**, set to become the 15th inmate executed this year and the 492nd inmate executed since reinstatement of the death penalty. Hughes was sentenced to death for the 1988 double murder of 15-year-old

LaShandra Charles and her 3-year-old cousin, Marcell Taylor, who were found stabbed to death on a weed-choked trail behind a Fuddruckers in far West Houston (see "Framing the Guilty?", Nov. 2). Although Charles' carotid artery and jugular were severed, the first HPD detective arriving at the scene later claimed that Charles was awake and able to talk – and to tell him that she knew her attacker, whose name was Preston. Police quickly moved to a nearby apartment complex, where they found Hughes. Police say they found evidence in his apartment that matched the crime, including a pair of fashion glasses that Charles had been known to wear as an accessory.

Hughes' appeals have been unsuccessful despite a plethora of evidence that suggests either that he is the wrong man, or that he was framed by police despite

being guilty: Evidence records reflect that police logged evidence into custody several hours before they had permission to search Hughes' apartment. Notably, the glasses that police considered a direct link between Charles and Hughes were not on the evidence list; Hughes' attorney and supporters believe they were planted in the apartment some time in the hours after Charles was discovered. Moreover, when asked by the *Chronicle* this fall to review the autopsy evidence, Tarrant County Deputy Medical Examiner Lloyd White concluded that it would have been medically impossible for Charles to have been conscious and talking after sustaining such a fatal injury.

Hughes' attorney Pat McCann has filed several recent appeals – including one that raises the question of police having planted evidence – each of which has been denied. Meanwhile, California-based blogger John Allen, known online as the **Skeptical Juror** (www.skepticaljuror.com), has helped Hughes to file a flurry of pro se writs; each of those also has been denied, clearing the way for Hughes' execution this evening, Thursday, Nov. 15. – *Jordan Smith*

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# The Birth of Formula One – Austin

Some welcome the new offspring, and some don't, but the high-speed newcomer is at the starting gate

Two and a half years ago, Austinites heard for the first time that their city would be hosting the first United States Formula One Grand Prix in half a decade. Frankly, most locals had no idea what that meant, and even now, on the eve of the race, many Austinites are still trying to work it out. What's happened in the interim has been the construction of the Circuit of the Americas: In what was until recently the sleepy Southeast backwater of Elroy, up has sprung a race track/concert venue/business park that will host the first U.S. Grand Prix since 2007. This week, tens of thousands of guests arrive for the three-day race weekend - but many wonder whether the city really knows what it's in for.

That's partly a consequence of its political history at the Texas Capitol, where a sweetheart deal (the state's "Major Events Trust Fund") that would bring to the race sponsors a 10-year subsidy of \$25 million a year was on, then off, on again, and now pending – but in the bargain polarized the response of the city to the whole project.

Beyond that political backstory, four questions have pursued the development of Formula One in Austin: Does Austin want it? When is it happening? What is it? And, most importantly, is Austin ready for it? Three of those questions have been answered. The fourth? Well, the city and the Circuit will know when the last visiting racegoer flies away.

# **Does Austin Want It?**

When the F1 announcement was made in 2010, there were four local responses: Some people welcomed it, some were concerned about its impact, some didn't know what it was, and some just didn't want anything to do with it. The criticisms have been all over the map, from the understandable (should Texas be subsidizing international sports when schools are underfunded?) to the nebulous (it just isn't "Austin-y" or sufficiently "weird"). Many seized on the regularly controversial comments by "F1 Supremo" (as he's known in the English tabs)

Bernie Ecclestone, while others condemned it as a sport solely for the rich, the elites, and foreigners.

Yet for Austin's Mayor Lee Leffingwell, it "represents that maturation of the city of Austin." Just since the project began, Austin has jumped from being the 17th biggest city in America to the 13th. Leffingwell said, "We've been in this transition for so many years from a sleepy college town into a big city - and in a big city, you have people with a wide range of tastes. You have people who like F1 and people who don't. You have people who think it's going to be bad for the reputation of the city, and some people who think it's going to be great."

The anti-F1 crowd pointed to the spotted history of Formula One in the U.S. Proponents argue that spotted or not, it's long. There were Grand Prix races held in America regularly from 1959 to 1991, before the sport was resurrected in 2000 at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Yet those closing years muddied the issue of whether American fans will support F1. Drivers hated the track, mechanics called it frustrating and dangerous, and track management had its three biggest races - F1, the Indianapolis 500, and the Brickyard 400 - so tightly scheduled that audiences for all three collapsed. But whether it's just initial curiosity or real interest, the first year in Austin has sold well: More than 110,000 tickets have been purchased, 85% of those by U.S. buyers, and half of those by Texans. The race has also attracted a big international crowd, with COTA reporting sales in 46 countries.

However, controversy about construction of the track turned the event into a political kickball. At the state level, Comptroller Susan Combs was savaged by Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson for letting the track apply to the state's Major Events Trust Fund (see "The Courtship of Susan and Bernie," p.26). Locally, Leffingwell's support was used against him in this year's mayoral race. Leffingwell has battled many misconceptions - that the city paid for the track or for the F1



sanctioning, or that it was all just a backroom deal among power players.

Whatever your perspective, Austin is days away from the biggest single sporting event it has ever seen. An estimated 120,000 people will attend the three-day race event, and organizers claim there will be 300,000 visitors, sightseers, and tourists in the region over the weekend. It's a big event, but Austin regularly does big events South by Southwest, the Austin City Limits Festival, and Longhorn football home games,. Leffingwell is frustrated that - because many people didn't understand it - they've held F1 to a different standard than similar projects. For example, Council faced pushback over Downtown street closures during race weekend, even though street closures for major events are regularly approved by staff. Council also took flak when it reimbursed the developers for installing utilities, even though that is standard practice for major projects in the city's desired development zone. Leffingwell said, "I think that a lot of people are just looking for reasons not to like it."

# When Is It Happening?

For a long time, "when" and "if" went hand in hand and were tied to one thing: money. Austin-born former driver Tavo Hellmund provided the vision. His father had promoted motor racing in Mexico, including the Mexican Grand Prix, and Hellmund dreamed of bringing F1 back to his hometown. It wasn't just a sentimental gamble; Hellmund had known F1 boss Ecclestone for decades and secured a favorable 10-year hosting contract. He also calculated that, with Austin being equidistant from both coasts, Canada, and South America, it would attract a big national and international contingent. But it was Texas financial behemoth Red McCombs and financier Bobby Epstein who were paying for the track itself.


That division of power nearly crashed the entire project.

The Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile - FIA, the sport's governing body originally scheduled the race for June 17, 2012. Cue a collective groan - a race in Austin's blazing summer sounded like no fun and set a tight construction deadline. Behind the scenes, there was a multimillion-dollar game of chicken. Rumors of a go-slow had circled for months, and finally, last fall, construction ground to a halt for 11 days. Hellmund broke the icy silence accusing Epstein and McCombs of cutting corners and failing to fulfill their deal with him, and so he refused to hand over the event contract. Ecclestone threatened to pull the plug on Austin, and rumors started spreading that F1 would instead hold a race in New Jersey.

Finally, Ecclestone set a deadline: If the warring parties could not reach a settlement before the FIA approved the 2012 cal-

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endar in December 2011, then the Austin Grand Prix would be cancelled. That shattered the ice – but left Hellmund out in the cold. At the time, he said, "I am willing to do whatever it is for this project to happen, including not be a part of it." He withdrew, settled out of court with Epstein and McCombs, and the Circuit signed a new, tougher deal with F1. But Hellmund did not go quietly: Lawsuits and allegations of dirty tricks and underhanded dealings have been flying back and forth for months.

## What Is It?

With so many arguments about when and if the race was happening, the pivotal question – what "F1" exactly is – remained unanswered for many.

It's not the city's job to explain what F1 is, and there have been long stretches – especially when the writs were flying – when the Circuit was keeping a low profile. Six months ago, British expat and F1 enthusiast Ian Weightman took part of the responsibility for spreading the word – first through his Formula1AustinBlog.com, and then in his day job as a PR professional. This summer, in collaboration with COTA, he organized Formula Expo – a two-day crash course in the history and spectacle of F1 that hosted 15,000 attendees.

The enthusiasm is not all out of the goodness of Weightman's heart, as he will be running two big events over race weekend: the high-rolling Blu at the W Hotel event


# THE COURTSHIP OF SUSAN AND BERNIE

Texas loves its business subsidies. But rarely has any public cash for a private concern caused as much controversy as the Formula One application for the **Major Events Trust Fund**.

The METF was originally set up to help local jurisdictions cover the excess costs of hosting a major event, but the money flow is a little convoluted. Say a county hosts a major event.

They have to cover all kinds of additional costs – policing, public safety, road closures, and so on – that they'd not normally have. However, in the aftermath of such an event, the state collects a lot of extra sales tax money from all the visitors. Under the METF, the state reimburses the local governing body from that additional cash.

Over the years, tens of millions of dollars have gone out of the METF, starting with \$8.7 million to Houston for 2004's Superbowl XXXVIII. Most recently, Arlington got \$98,277 to cover costs from June's soccer match between Mexico and Brazil. However, the **Circuit of the Americas** application was different. Before a race can happen, motor circuits pay a multimillion-dollar "hosting fee" to F1, and COTA struck a deal with the Comptroller's Office that the state would cover the cost of its \$25 million fee. This meant the cash would come first (out of the state's share of the



sales tax), and it would go to the event, not the host city.

The deal was for the next 10 years, so, depending on how you looked at it, COTA was either getting the same \$25 million over and over again, just recycled through the METF, or COTA was getting a \$250 million handout from the state, in installments. Alternatively, the state was either doing what it needed to secure a major international sporting event, or Comptroller **Susan Combs** was handing F1 boss **Bernie Ecclestone** a quarter of a billion dollars.

The idea of such a subsidy caused outrage, especially as the state faced multibillion-dollar budget cuts, particularly to education and health care. Even Austin Sen. **Kirk Watson**, who originally proposed adding F1 to the list of METF-eligible events, in the end voted against adding the necessary cash to the fund. Land Commissioner **Jerry Patterson** – who now faces Combs in the 2014 lieutenant governor race – asked Attorney General **Greg Abbott** to opine on whether the comptroller broke the rules. Abbott (who is rumored to be running for higher office himself, potentially governor) demurred and issued a noncommittal opinion that merely stated there was a process to be followed – not whether Combs broke it or not. Combs and the Circuit both backed down, and now there will be a regular application – to be considered and calculated after the race, not before.

But did COTA ever need the money in the first place? COTA played a game of brinksmanship, constantly claiming that without the METF cash to pay the hosting fee, the race would not happen. However, there's a race this weekend without it, management has guaranteed F1 its hosting fee for the next decade – and there's no state payment thus far. – Richard Whittaker

and the Prohibition-themed Gold at the Four at the Four Seasons hotel (see "Ibiza on the Colorado," p.34). He's been making presentations to Downtown residents and the real fixers (like condo concierges) to explain what F1 means for Downtown. "It's ramping up," he said, "but I still don't think the majority of people understand the dif-

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ference between this and what we're used to with SXSW and ACL."

# Is Austin Ready?

The last remaining question is arguably the most practical: Will Austin be prepared for the estimated 300,000 visitors?


No doubt Circuit management wants the first year at its \$300 million track to be a success. And the city administration doesn't want to be left looking like chumps who can't handle a major event.

The official mantra is simple: This is like SXSW or ACL, only bigger. The Austin Police Department will be focusing on what Chief Art Acevedo called "tourism-based policing" – preventing problems before they occur and making sure visitors do not get into trouble. That means massive personnel commitments, shifted staffing schedules, and detectives on uniformed patrol.

Acevedo is confident that his staff can handle public safety – but when it comes to getting to and from the race, both the city and the Circuit are more cautious. On Nov. 5, the Circuit broke in the track with Formula Run, a 5K footrace. The race itself went smoothly, but the 5,000 runners faced traffic jams.

The Circuit blamed some of the delays on unexpected fog, and road construction still in progress. Moreover, Circuit management and the city have arranged race-day shuttle buses and limited car access that – if everyone follows the plan – should mean a 40- to 50-minute ride. Yet this is an unprecedented public transport task, and, Acevedo said traffic management will be "the biggest part for us." (See "Planes, Trains, and Automobiles," p.32)

Then there's the airport. The city of Austin took over Bergstrom Air Force Base in





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1999 because the old Robert Mueller Municipal Airport was beyond capacity. Now Austin-Bergstrom International Airport is approaching the same problem, with hourlong security lines on many mornings. Council has already approved a \$50 million expansion, but that will not be complete until 2015, and a proposal for a temporary extra terminal was shot down. Considering too the usual Thanksgiving rush, staff is expecting record passenger numbers and record lines.

And that's all just a fraction of the preparation. City and county staff have been approving permits, ramping up trash collection schedules, coordinating EMS coverage, and preparing for a PR onslaught. Economic Growth and Redevelopment Services Deputy Director Rodney Gonzales said, "We're not planning for a perfect event." Instead, he said, the city is planning "for those contingencies and those emergencies that might happen."

# The Future of the Circuit and the Future of F1

Whatever happens this weekend, the Circuit of the Americas plans to remain a major presence in Austin. As long as COTA can front the hosting fee – in theory the outcome of its incremental sales tax agreement with the state – there will be a U.S. Grand Prix in Austin for the next 10 years. The Circuit is already selling tickets for its next two race series: MotoGP in April and V8 Supercars in May. Long-term plans include research and tech parks in the surrounding area, plus more housing. Sleepy Elroy, with its scrubland and handful of businesses, is headed toward annexation as part of Austin proper.

But what about F1? COTA has its deal, but those New Jersey rumors keep rumbling. One day it's on, next day it's off, and one source close to COTA said Ecclestone's waffling is taken from the same playbook he used when playing hardball with Austin. More worryingly, there are rumors of a



revived Mexican Grand Prix, which could bite into foreign tourist dollars. That creates potential trouble and opportunities for COTA: If the race is successful this year and undermines the idea that F1 is somehow "un-American," it could reshape the entire sport. If COTA fails, on the other hand, it's Indianapolis all over again.

For now, Mayor Leffingwell remains optimistic about the first race and what it means for Austin. He said, "I think that, after the fact, there's going to be a great many more people who think this has been a great thing for the city."

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# **Green or Greenwash?**

# Formula One tests the city's standards for sustainable projects

The city of Austin may not be directly invested in the Circuit of the Americas, but Austin has definitely staked some of its reputation as a green city on the project. On June 29, 2011, City Council approved a deal confirming its support of the track (see "City Hall Hustle: Skid Marks on the Dais," July 1, 2011), but that came with some major strings attached. Council Member Chris Riley said, "I want the deal to reflect Austin's commitment to sustainability, and ... I want the F1 site to be seen as a model for sustainability efforts." But critics of the project argue that Austin simply signed off on a "greenwashing" memo.

A month after council OK'd the deal, City Manager Marc Ott and the Circuit Events Local Organizing Committee approved its final language. Six of the document's 19 pages, called "Exhibit A," itemize the green requirements for Austin to maintain its relationship with the track.

That's where Edgar Farrera comes in. A 20-year veteran of large-scale environmental projects, he was hired by COTA in January as the first-ever dedicated sustainability officer anywhere on the international Grand Prix circuit (see "Formula Farrera," Jan. 13). His job is to make sure the Circuit complies with the deal, but he says his personal commitment is to exceed

its terms. One source close to the project said it's sometimes been difficult to hear Farrera's voice over the maelstrom of construction and deadlines. Yet Farrera himself is upbeat, if realistic, about the challenges he faces.

The deal breaks down into three components: structural, operational, and long-term. The structural

elements are built into the track and its surrounding developments, such as energy efficiency requirements for all new buildings bigger than 2,000 square feet. The core of the long-term plan is building a Green Racing and Transportation Research, Education, and Testing Center, as well as encouraging auto races that stress efficiency and alternative energy, such as the student engineering competition Formula SAE.

But the most pressing terms concern operational elements: how the track will minimize its environmental impact on race days. Put simply, 120,000 people at the track generate a lot of waste and a lot of emissions. Farrera seems confident that the systems he has put in place can work - if racegoers understand them and abide by the rules. For example, the track worked with caterers Sodexo and the staffs at Texas Disposal Systems and Ecology Action to maximize recyclables. However, track management can provide all the necessary recycling and composting bins, but it takes only 10% contamination to turn it into 100% trash. So across race weekend, Farrera will have volunteers directing visitors to throw the right trash in the right bins. "Because the majority of our impact is going to be large events," he said, "a lot of the opportunities will deal with the large number of people coming out here and our ability to influence them, hopefully positively."

If the Circuit can green up race weekends, it could help other big events like Austin City Limits and South by Southwest.

Farrera also sees an opportunity for COTA to innovate on the national stage - in no small part because so little has yet been done. In September, he attended the second annual Green Sports Alliance summit in Seattle. He said, "I met the head of sustainability for the National Hockey League; they've had that position for two months. Major League Baseball, that position's been around for maybe nine months." For Farrera, sustainable event planning is where sustainable architecture was a decade ago: "There was an understanding that we needed to do better, that we could do better, but that we also needed better tools. We had the guestions, but we didn't have the answers."

# Little and Late?

Nevertheless, not everyone involved in the city's green agreement is happy with it. Tom "Smitty" Smith of Public Citizen, who was part of the advisory group that helped draft Exhibit A, said, "The process was set up to fail from day one." He found that the track limited negotiations and pressured the

city by threatening to pull the deal. He said, "Our hands were tied behind our back and most of our fingers were tied together." The result, he says, is "a lightly greenwashed program." He argues that if the city had more time, there could have been better transport and infrastructure planning, as well as better terms governing vendors. Instead, he said, "We're stuck with a deal that probably should never have been done."

Smitty doesn't blame Farrera, whom he called "a well-meaning man with a lot of skills and talent." But he says Farrera should have been at the table from the beginning, not brought in when the track was already under construction. Instead, he points the finger squarely at project attorney Richard Suttle, saying, "It's another of those 'Hurry up and make the deal or we'll take it elsewhere' flimflams that the city of Austin management falls for repeatedly."



Indeed, Farrera acknowledged that having a deal signed before there was a sustainability officer created some problems for him. Early on, he had to review the deal in depth, analyzing "not just how I understood it, but how the city viewed it." Coming on board after construction started limited some of his input: "You could say that perhaps I would have loved to come in earlier in the design and have a hand in that." Similarly, some of the terms of the deal were good ideas with hidden issues.

Take the COTA commitment to buy 50% of its carbon offset credits locally. Farrera said, "It sounded very simple, but as I started looking into it, I discovered there weren't any true third-party-certified carbon-offset programs in the city limits." But rather than give up, he started working on a sequestration program with the city and local urban forestry nonprofit TreeFolks. Similarly, he pushed hard for the Eco Opt-In Ticketing Initiative: Starting with the track's first MotoGP race, scheduled for April 2013, racegoers will be able to add a donation to one of three local environmental groups. It sounds simple, but Farrera said it came with many technical and process challenges.

Like Smith, environmental activist Scott Johnson is still unhappy with the deal. An emissions expert, he worked with Smith on some terms of the green deal, such as a requirement to minimize ozone-forming and carbon emissions from construction and landscaping for all future projects. He says a lot of work remains to be done. He's most concerned that some steps the track is taking, like buying carbon credits, will have no real impact on the local pollution effects of race day. He said, "Reducing carbon emissions and offsetting them is not the same as reducing ozone-forming precursor emissions and particulate matter" - especially, he noted, if the carbon credits are being bought outside of Central Texas.

# **Gathering the Data**

On race day itself, the biggest single source of pollution will be combustion engines - not of the race cars, but of the buses and cars taking people to and from the Circuit. The longer that process takes, the worse the pollution will be. COTA held its first big event on Nov. 3 with Formula Run, a 5K footrace on the track. Bad weather didn't help, but just 5,000 runners caused traffic jams on a Saturday morning. Still, the city and the track are gambling that a huge public transport initiative will ease the problems (see "Planes Trains Automobiles," p.32). Council Member Riley a keen bicyclist himself - was most excited about the cycle track from Richard Moya Park to a shuttle valet service near the Circuit and has given feedback to city staff about sections that still need help. "If I have to be out there with a broom myself," he said, "I will be making sure that we've got that path clear."

Smitty sees the bike park as a Pyrrhic victory, because the bicycle route itself stops short of the Circuit. He said, "You can ride to the park, but you still have to take the bus to get out there, which [eliminates] most of the value of having bicycles." He sees that as part of a slate of "promises that were made that were barely kept, and many [that] were hollow in the first place."

Neither Riley nor Farrera is expecting a "zero emissions" race in the first year, but both are expecting a lot of data. Farrera has continually updated Smith and the council - via the city's Chief Sustainability Officer Lucia Athens - on his progress and plans to present an F1 "green score card" in January. He has assembled a team of 50 volunteers to monitor air quality, while the track will be recording energy usage across the day. "We've got a plan on paper," said Farrera, "and I hope we get some of the results we're hoping for." Once the race is over, he and his staff will spend the next month collating all the data they've collected.

That data is where the rubber will truly meet the road – and determine whether the deal was a true step toward environmental responsibility, or whether Smitty and other critics are right. Riley said, "The jury's still out on overall performance, but what's clear is that we have mechanisms in place to gauge this first year and to ensure that we do better in future years."





Whether you're just visiting or a full-time Austinite, you'll probably need some help navigating the roadways this weekend. Here's our best guesses for how to get from Point A to Point B - whether Point B is the Circuit of the Americas or as far from there as possible.

# **GETTING TO THE TRACK**

## By Complimentary Shuttle:

There'll be two pickup points: the Travis County Expo Center, 7311 Decker Lane, and the corner of 15th and Trinity. The city is recommending that visitors use the Downtown site, while residents should head to the Expo Center. Check your ticket for details. The trip should take 30-50 minutes each way.


By Car: There are still a limited number of parking spaces for sale, for those with a separate race ticket. Remember, if you don't have a parking pass already, you cannot drive to the Circuit. Don't try walking to the gate either: You will not be admitted.


By Bike: The city has designed a bike-only route from Downtown to Richard Moya Park. From there, dedicated valet coaches will take you to and from the track. There will be secure bike parking and portable showers available. Out-of-towners looking for some exercise can contact one of these local bike-rental

#### **GETTING AROUND TOWN**

Public Transport: It doesn't take much for Austin to get gridlocked, and it will probably be worse with all the street closures. So the easiest way to travel for visitors will be Cap Metro bus service. Most buses run from early morning until midnight: After that, you should take the Night Owls.

Fares are cheap (\$1 per trip, \$2 for a 24-hour pass). If you don't have any change, the transit authority is rolling out the Austin Capital Metro App (available from the Apple App Store and Google Play), which will let you buy one-day and seven-day passes on your phone. You'll also need your phone to navigate the system: Cap Metro got rid of printed timetables, and now uses QR codes. If you can't read the code, visit www.capmetro.org/stopid and just type in the number of your stop (look for it on the sign).

Cap Metro will also be running a free circulator service around Downtown. from north of the Capitol to Town Lake, Friday-Sunday, 7am-2:30am.

If you're staying north of the city, try the MetroRail Red Line, which runs from Leander to the Convention Center. It'll run extended hours this weekend: Friday, 6am-midnight; Saturday, 10ammidnight; Sunday, 10am-8pm. Visit www.capmetro.org/f1 for more info.

Taxis: There are three cab companies in Austin. You can get one at most downtown hotels, or call or book online, but we recommend getting a driver's card. Calling them directly is always the best way to find them at peak hours. For non-Americans – yes, tipping your driver is recommended.

Pedicabs: When the traffic's bad, this can be the quickest way for a couple of people to get around town. Be warned, though; they charge by the block, so it can get pricey.


Road Closures: Austin loves its outdoor events. from the Pecan Street Festival to Bat Fest. The downside is street closures, and Formula One will be no exception. The good news is that two of the big celebratory events - Austin Fan Fest and Experience Austin - have merged into one, meaning less of Downtown will be blocked off across race weekend. As always, Sixth Street will be closed on the weekend evenings.

The city is sending out a particular warning about MLK: That's the main route from Downtown to the track, and city staff will be retiming lights to get the shuttle buses running as fast as possible. That means crossing MLK could be tough. Aside from that, it's probably just a good idea to steer clear of anywhere near the routes to the track - unless you really like bumper-tobumper traffic.

# A Beginner's Guide to Formula One

DEBUNKING MYTHS IN A CRASH COURSE TO RACE WEEKEND

So you live here and can't avoid the race talk anymore, huh? Maybe you're singing those inimitable words of Rhett Miller: "Where did all these people come from, and how soon can they leave?"

We've been bracing for this for years now, folks. You've followed all the twists and turns of the tale so far (see p.24 if you need a refresher), and Formula One is finally in our midst.

When the rubber meets the road at the new Circuit of the Americas this weekend, it will mark the first time in five years that a Grand Prix, the crown jewel of international motor sports, will be run in the U.S. With that in mind, we offer you this brief primer on Formula One racing. It's at least enough to give you something to talk about around the watercooler on Monday.



Wrong. The Formula One World Championship is the pinnacle of single-seat, opencockpit, and open-wheel auto racing. The cars must adhere to a specific set of engineering standards – the "formula" – and are the fastest and most innovative automobiles of their kind - hence, the "one." The carbonfiber-based cars, with driver, weigh just over 1,000 pounds; the car's hallmark wings mounted at front and rear - provide significant downforce, which keeps the cars stable and allows them to corner at high speed.



# Don't they only turn left?

At ease, Zoolander. The Formula One season is made up of a series of races, or Grand Prix, held around the world – from Bahrain to Australia to Singapore and now, Austin. Races are held on special F1 tracks - like Austin's 3.4-mile Circuit of the Americas or on courses created on existing city streets. Either way, an F1 circuit is much more than the left-left-left turns that NASCAR and other stock car racing fans are used to. They're full of switchbacks, elevation changes, and straightaways along which the cars can reach speeds well over 200 mph.

All this for one race?

Not exactly. This is a three-day event that culminates with the running of the Grand Prix on Sunday at 1pm. Things really get going on Friday morning, starting at 9am, with the first of three practice sessions. These allow the drivers and their teams to get a feel for the track - and its challenges - and to begin to plot strategy for the race. On Saturday at noon, the drivers will begin the qualifying sessions. In a series of three heats, drivers will shoot for their fastest laps, earning their spots on the starting grid and shooting for the coveted pole position - the No. 1 spot, which affords the driver the greatest physical advantage to pull ahead and set the pace of the race. (It is possible to be disqualified if the car and driver don't perform up to par - known as the 107% rule, all cars must be within 107% of the fastest qualifying time in order to remain in the race; in essence, this is a safety rule: Slow cars can be dangerous obstacles.)

On Sunday, drivers take to the track a half-hour before start time to warm up their cars - key to this is warming up the tires, to achieve maximum grip on the track. At race time, the cars are lined up according to grid position and, after one last relatively slow "formation" or warm-up lap, they're off! The Austin race will consist of 56 laps around the track, for a total distance of about 192 miles.

So, what are the rules? As you'd expect, and generally speaking, the first person to cross the finish line after completing all 56 laps is the winner. (Fun fact: The race must finish within two hours or it is called, regardless of the number of laps completed - this is mostly an issue for racing in extreme weather conditions, and thus isn't likely this weekend in Austin.) Points are awarded to the top 10 finishers, with the first-place driver receiving 25 points and the 10th place finisher earning one point.

During the race, drivers may make any number of pit stops, where crews can fix damage to the car or replace tires. No refueling is allowed. There are two types of tires used on these cars, and during the course of the race each car must use both types. When to pit and when to change tires is a matter of strategy among the racing teams. The goal, of course, is to maximize the car's potential.

# I have a seat, but what will I see?

Because an F1 track is longer and more involved than, say, Texas Motor Speedway, you can't sit in one seat and see all the action. Some folks like the straightaway, where cars go the fastest and where the start/finish line is located. At Austin's track, the main grandstand is located along this straight. Others prefer to watch from a turn, where more technical driving is on display and where most of the passing action happens. Wherever you stand or sit, remember this: Bring ear protection - preferably the over-the-ear variety. Shooting sport ear protection works well, and you can pick up a decent pair for cheap at any local sporting goods store. Motor sports are incredibly loud - the sort of piercing sound you can't appreciate until you've actually experienced it. Yes, this is the live music capital of the world, but trust us, standing near the Wall of Sound is nothing compared to the roar of dozens of engines blasting by you. Also good to bring to race day: binoculars, rain protection (you never know), and a small radio (satellite, transistor) that can be used with earbuds, because you can't see everything at the track, and it's nice to listen in to find out what's going on at other points along the circuit. Austin's race will be carried live on SiriusXM channel 208, 104.9FM ESPN the Horn, and KLBJ News Radio 590AM.



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# Reveries

The expression "falling into reverie" is not accurate. "Slide" is more like it. You slide into a reverie, sort of from the side. It's not an ordinary memory. It's that, in a sudden but gentle way, I go to a place of the past that feels completely present: I'm there and here. And this state sustains itself for a bit, until the teapot whistles or the phone rings.

It's not grammatical to begin and end paragraphs with ellipses, but that punctuation conveys a kind of sliding. In reverie, I go here and there ...

... a trailer in the middle of nowhere. Butch and Janette are still asleep. For some reason, I turn on the TV (it gets three Amarillo channels). There's Sesame Street: two cartoon panels, illustrated. Together they say: "Life is strange,' said Jeremy. 'Compared to what?' said the spider." I smile and turn off the TV. I open the trailer door into bright spring sunlight, a Texas Panhandle spectacle: rolling chaparral, horizon to horizon, east to west. The chaparral's scents are strong and sweet. I step outside and idly walk toward the quarry. The overwhelming sky extends from forever down to my feet. Suddenly, overhead, a sound - a rush of musical, feathery whispering, so very wonderful. Raw joy overtakes me so completely that I'm not even me. I'm that sound. I look up. It's a flight of mud wrens – but I don't know this until I look up. When I see that I'm hearing birds' wings, I'm sort of me again. I walk toward where the mud wrens flew. I stand on the cliff above the quarry. Below, in a small valley, runs the narrow, shallow Salt Fork of the Red River. I'm me again, but the sensation of being not-me is fresh - a moment that felt like I was lifted into flight. A moment only, when I was 28, but, the older I get, that moment returns and returns ...

... a rooftop in Brooklyn: 1286 Decatur Street. To be poor, really poor, is to be very hungry sometimes and a little bit hungry all the time. To be really poor is to be 11 years old and to see the helplessness in your mother's eyes because she can't properly feed you - and nothing scares you more than helplessness in your mother's eyes. Even the big boys who rape you in the public bathroom in Halsey Street Park don't scare you that way. Being beaten by bullies doesn't scare you that way. You have a weapon against bullies. They want you to say, "I give, I give - I surrender." But that is the one thing you won't say. Your dignity, and the dignity of your family, depends on that one thing: You will not say, "I give." You get beat, but you don't surrender. And you're very hungry sometimes and a little hungry all the time. And the only place you feel free is on the roof of 1286 Decatur Street. You don't understand anything. You don't understand why your father abandons you. You don't understand why your mother is helpless or why you must be hungry. But you understand never to say, "I give." You understand that crying does no good. You understand that cockroaches and fevers are inescapable. And you go to the rooftop to read books by Andre Norton, Robert Louis Stevenson, and books about astronomy that you don't understand. From that rooftop you see a city of rooftops like yours. With no ability to formulate the idea, you know you own only this: the look in your eyes. On this rooftop, you learn the world is wide. Wider than your life. You can't put it into words, but you know it. You go to the rooftop every chance you get. It feels something like freedom - a place to go where you can feel, but not yet

sav, what you know. And you know that there is one sin that will not be forgiven: to forget that you are one of the poor. You take that knowledge with you always. Whatever you become, wherever you go, you are the 11-yearold on that rooftop who knows, without being able to say it, that what he has, and all he has, is the look in his eyes. To that roof I

return and return ...

... another rooftop, in West Hollywood - 1236 Flores. My 51st year. Built on a steep slope of the Hollywood Hills, this four-story building, constructed in 1932, commands a view from the Pacific on the west to the lights of Dodger Stadium on the east. Just north, the Sunset Tower glows with ghosts of old Hollywood - Greta Garbo, Clark Gable, and Joan Crawford dallied there. Bette Davis kept an apartment nearby. When Marilyn Monroe filmed Gentlemen Prefer Blondes, she lived up the street and around the corner. F. Scott Fitzgerald died several streets west. On a pavement slab in front of 1236 Flores, Jean Harlow signed her name when the slab was freshly wet; her studio built this place as a hotel for its starlets. Steve Erickson put 1236 Flores in his novels and called it "The Hamblin." His apartment, on the third floor, faces west and south. On the fourth floor, my apartment faces east and north. He and I write for LA Weekly. We're both writing books. I'm writing scripts. We're what I call "working writers" - a dream come true, and, like all dreams, this dream is made of ambiguities, twisting and turning through what's uncharted. For several weeks I go to the roof every night and face northwest, where a comet seems to hover. They call it Hyakutake. Even L.A.'s glare can't dim it. Is everything connected?

Maybe so. I feel connected to that comet by something more than fascination, but all I know of our connection is that we're both just passing through. Gritty, glamorous L.A. and frantic, apocalyptic America are also the works of passers-by. As on that Brooklyn rooftop, I don't understand much. Seems like that comet is the universe winking at me, for no reason in particular. Me going to the roof night after night that's how I wink back. It's queerly satisfying. I draw no conclusions. I don't need any. Not on this rooftop with that comet in the sky. I suppose that is why, in reverie, I return to that roof many times ...

... I look at the reflection of my 24-yearold face. The Museum of Modern Art protects Vincent van Gogh's Starry Night with glass. Stand where you will, transparent reflections coat the painting. But there is something correct about this: You must look at yourself and beyond yourself to see the masterpiece. (Some claim van Gogh painted as he did because something was wrong with his eyes. As Kierkegaard said,



in a similar context, "Let those frogs croak in their swamp

> undisturbed.") They've tried to make Starry Night vulgar by reproducing it on souvenir cups, mouse pads, and dishrags, but nothing can hurt it. Even on a mouse pad it does what it does and says what it says. I stand less than an arm's length away; in relation to the painting, I stand where van Gogh stood to paint it. The stars perform their

pinwheel swirls over an unquiet Earth where cypress trees rise in shapes of flames, for life flames in them. Life shimmers almost unbearably anywhere you look in the world of the painting, and, anywhere you look, your eye follows stroke after stroke, as swirls of the stars flow into the earth while the things of Earth pulse into the starry sky, and nothing goes in a straight line, and nothing is excluded from the dance. And I, standing there, as so many others before and after me - I, and we, are not excluded. Our reflections have nothing to do with this. It's as though the painting draws in our reflections and makes them part of itself. The proof is how quickly one's reflection is forgotten. First it's, "Damn these reflections." Then, somehow, you no longer see them. Van Gogh has won. For moments, his vision envelops you and you are part of it all. The poor devils wearing headsets to "explain" the painting - I barely refrain from jerking those things from their ears with, "Just look! It's all there, where he put it." Several times a week, for much of that year, I return to this painting, and to the Water Lilies of Monet, and to the dancers of Matisse, and I still return ....

A sentence comes to me. I can't take credit for it. It said itself: Beauty is something you don't have to deserve.

## **Dances Made To Order**

#### ANTHROPOMORPHISM, UPHEAVAL, AND MEMORY IN DANCE FOR THE SMALL SCREEN

Just 17 days before the premiere of the Austin edition of the online dance-film festival Dances Made To Order, choreographers Ellen Bartel, Kathy Dunn Hamrick, and Katherine Hodges each received an email revealing the two themes that would drive their work: "let me in/let me out" and "beginning to disappear." In a roundabout way, the choreographers themes were self-directed: They were chosen by visitors to the DMTO site, from a longer list developed by Los Angelesbased founder Kingsley Irons, who extrapolated the ideas from the choreographers' answers to her questions ("Dances Made to Order," Oct. 19). The winning suggestions, posed in unassuming lowercase, are decidedly nondirective and introspective, and smartly so. Rather than simply illustrating how oh-so-different the fibers that bind movement to concept can be, Irons' endeavor leaves the concepts themselves open for interpretation, while giving the artists a thought-provoking jump start for quick-turnaround creation.

For dance on camera, creation means not just choreography, music, and costuming, but also filming and editing two-dimensional footage into a multifaceted work. In this genre, the freshness and spontaneity of live theatre give way to sleek frames in select takes, but this is a loss in exchange for the gifts of the camera: manipulation of the viewer's focus and allowances for impossible moves in space and time. Transitions can all but disappear, while other moments can be unpacked, stretched out, pulled, left out to breathe. And, of course, film offers a novelty many dance artists rarely consider: preservation for posterity.

So, it's not surprising that for all three choreographers, time manipulation and preservation are important considerations. Hamrick has choreographed in Austin for more than a decade but has done little work in film, and for her, posterity isn't something to be scoffed at. In a blog post on the DMTO website, she ponders the pros and cons of creating work that could potentially outlast herself. Her film, however, is a seguel to a concert work that I am in no danger of forgetting: the final two-minute segment of last year's FlashDance, but Flashier: 30 More Dances in 60 Minutes. In that whimsical yet tear-jerking 120 seconds, Hamrick anthropomorphized two cardboard boxes in a failed relationship - believe me, it was more than the sum of its parts. Her DMTO film, Hamrick says, allows her, in collaboration with Kakii Keenan, to do "things with the box that we couldn't do onstage." She wouldn't give away the ending, but I am hoping that in the film, the forlorn box finds fulfillment.

As with much of Hamrick's work for the stage, her approach to the project was practical and lighthearted. For Bartel, the DMTO themes offered an opportunity to continue her exploration of what she has referred to as "transitional spaces," which are defined in space and time. Like her previous work, the transition in her DMTO film is both physical and nonphysical. It takes place in the basement of the home she shares with her husband, who was recently diagnosed with cancer. In the film, the basement, formerly the site of the couple's raucous happy hours, and home to murals, couches, drum sets, guitars, props, and costumes, begins to shoulder

the burdens of disorder, uprooting, transition. Working with a group of veteran dancers and her longtime composer/collaborator Adam Sultan, as well as with videographer Eliot Haynes, Bartel physically dismantles the space, via movement of and around the objects within it, in an effort to "break the static" of memory; to move forward.

Memory itself – its fragmented, imperfect self – is the subject of Hodges' film. Over several mornings, early enough to take advantage of the sun's first rays filtering into a mirror-filled space, Hodges and dancer Danielle Casey, who regularly work together on dance-film projects, consider when and how memories are made and reappear: How do we subconsciously choose which ones to allow in, close off, or rewrite? The answer there is complex, so if you take a few minutes out of your daily screen time to view these films, there's no telling which parts of them your mind will commit to memory, and during which of your future moments those memories will present themselves.

# 'Sordid Lives'

#### WIMBERLEY PLAYERS AUDIENCE REJECTS ACCUSATION OF PLAY'S OBSCENITY

By a show of hands, the majority of the audience attending the *Sordid Lives* preview Nov. 8 at Wimberley Playhouse indicated that they'd come because they'd heard about the controversy. The 117-seat house was full.

After the performance, playwright Del Shores spoke about the hullabaloo among the neighbors of Wimberley, occasionally reading names from the Aug. 14 petition that called for the play to be canceled. The petition to company president Kay Allison, which arrived as director Aaron Johnson was still casting, initiated a series of events concerned with Shores' employ of illicit language and gay characters.

"When you use these words like 'family values' or say 'the characters are stereotypical,' what they're really saying is: 'We don't want gay on our stage,'" said Shores, who lives in Los Angeles, but was raised in Winters, Texas.

An author of the petition did not return calls for comment, but a Wimberley Players representative told the *Chronicle*, via email, that in addition to becoming the target of homophobia and plain-old skittishness, the play had become an arena for unrelated and unsettled personal grievances among company members.

Artistic Director John Hood says that he first learned of the objection in a July 12 letter penned by board member Allen Eastman.

The petition itself is rather mild – calling for a special meeting of company members to replace Sordid Lives with a play more "appropriate for the membership and the community as a whole" - however, a Sept. 8 letter to the editor written on behalf of the petitioners to the Wimberley View declares the play "obscene and pornographic," warning that it will damage the company's reputation. (Johnson, cast, and crew had previously determined to use an alternative script provided by Shores with less illicit language.) The letter also encourages "currently paid up members" to attend the meeting. A second letter in the View, which repeatedly bemoans political correctness, is less careful: "Hood assures us how wonderfully humorous it will be to view, for the duration of the play, the antics of Ty, who is 'gay.'... God forbid we refer to him as 'homo' or 'queer.'"

Attendees at the Sept. 10 membership meeting, well attended by non-members, employed a menagerie of affecting words, such as "obscene," "Christian" and "censor-

ship," on behalf of the community. But, according to one attendee, when community members attempted to support the play, the opposition argued that Wimberley Players members retained exclusive right to speak. The meeting concluded without action.

"I don't think any of these people read the script," Shores said about the work, penned in 1996. "This play is not overly gay. It's much more about family."

Sordid Lives zooms in on a West Texas family right after the matriarch dies by tripping over her married lover's wooden legs. She had locked her son in the loony bin for being a gay transvestite, and, unbeknownst to her, her

grandson Tyler is a gay actor in Los Angeles. Tyler is also the play's narrator, appearing only briefly before each act and in the final scene, primarily discussing his fear of coming out to his very conservative mother. The bulk of the show focuses on his family and the sordid little revelations brought on by the matriarch's death.

"I'm a Texan, so it's insulting to me when they say I write caricatures," Shores told the Wimberley Playhouse audience. "Because the one reaction I get about this play is 'I have an Aunt Sissy.' Or 'I have an Aunt LaVonda.' Or 'My mother is Latrelle.' Well, my mother is Latrelle."

Shores explained that he knows firsthand the experience of coming out to his family and the challenge of facing people afraid of the change.

"What happens when you're gay is it takes us a long time to deal with it, and then we expect that everyone else should just deal with it immediately," Shores said. "You have to give them time as well."

Shores concluded with words of encouragement.

"Tell everyone to see this play. Fill the seats every night," he said. "It will be the biggest 'fuck you' to [the opposition]."

# Dawn in the EAST

Big Medium's Shea Little recalls the East Austin Studio Tour's beginning

Shea Little gazes over Big Medium's parking lot, which has been converted haphazardly into a courtyard. Artists casually walk in and out of the converted warehouse nestled off Bolm Road, chatting amongst themselves about their expectations for the weekends ahead. Excavated car seats and overgrown plants jut out between sculptures and unfinished projects. The space is unassuming for a venue that will host thousands of guests during the next two weekends, but Little seems unfazed by the looming event as he contentedly surveys the site that has served as his home, his studio, and an epicenter for Austin's artistic growth over the past 10 years. As we begin our conversation about the East Austin Studio Tour, Little discusses the unrelenting preparation for the 2012 event, touting almost 500 participating artists and boasting an extensive 193 tour stops. Since its inception in 2003, EAST has exploded into a whirlwind of visual art and design with an estimated 15,000 attendees roaming through an endless stream of

galleries, studios, pop-up shops, and DIY venues across Austin's Eastside. (The 2012 tour, which began last weekend, continues through Nov. 18.) For audiences, it is an opportunity to meet with local creatives and discuss their work in a uniquely relaxed setting. For artists, it is the largest single event in Austin to sell work, build a following, and actively engage with the public. As for Little, it was a personal attempt at directing more attention toward his art that has both mobilized a community and ultimately changed the landscape of Austin east of I-35.

After a stint out of state for college, Little returned to Austin in the early 2000s and found himself living and working out of his studio alongside fellow artists Joseph Phillips and Jana Swec. The artists sensed an increasing need to showcase their work to a wider audience while refining their own presentation. Little hoped to highlight the creative process as it truly was. "It was one of our initial things we latched on to. We were providing artists a chance to show

work outside of the gallery system," explains Little. "The gallery setting is so much about this persona and this display of you and your work. The studio is this really intimate environment where you are making your work. ... It's this behind-the-scenes peek, and I wanted to show that to the audience." This approach softened the often elitist art world and opened up the tour for families, gallery frequenters, and art enthusiasts alike. It has been integral to the success of EAST and the most enjoyable characteristic of the event.

EAST's early growth was sporadic. Little, Swec, and Phillips had founded Big Medium as a sole proprietorship but quickly saw the need to reinvent the business model in order to attain financial backing for EAST. Little states, "We did the first tour just with participants pitching in money. The second tour we started selling ads in our brochure. Around the third tour, we found out about the Cultural Arts Division." Over the next year, Little, Swec, and Phillips worked toward formally establishing Big Medium

as a nonprofit, and in 2007, they were offered event funding through the city of Austin's cultural contracts program. Little explains, "From 2003 until about 2008, we ran the tour and everything we did basically for free. If you added up everything we did and everything we got, it would be about a \$1 an hour pay [laughs], but we were doing these things because we were passionate about it and we wanted to see it happen."

The initial tours were successful in developing larger arts awareness and enticing

groups to visit what some considered troubled neighborhoods. Little pauses as he considers the evolution of the Eastside, an area struggling against cultural change. It is the one question that is difficult to answer for many of Austin's young artists who have profited off a neighborhood that is not wholly their own. Back in 2003, Little had consulted artists working out of East Austin studios prior to launching the tour, and their feedback confirmed his suspicions that people wouldn't attend exhibitions or

events on the Eastside because they were wary of the area. "The stigma was still very strong. East of I-35 were the neighborhoods with high crime. 'If you go over there, you'll get shot.' That was definitely still out there. That was the general psyche of Austin." Little hoped that cultivating creative communities and inviting outside audiences would change the neighborhood's reputation, though his attempts led some to accuse him of inviting gentrification to East Austin. When asked about how to bridge the gap between the art community and Eastside residents, Little imagines more opportunities for artists to connect with their neighbors and local schools. By turning to education and local involvement, EAST can exist as a part of the community instead of alongside it, a vital step in investing into the area that has fostered its success. He explains, "We've been thinking about the impact we've had on East Austin a lot, and I think we could play a bigger role. We need to play a bigger role."

With Formula One falling on EAST's closing weekend, the race offers a stark reminder of the city's light-speed 21st century growth competing against the inherently small grassroots Austin movement. Little remains optimistic that the artistic scene will remain intact in spite of such rampant change. "We're embracing the fact that we're not the traditional model of an arts community. We don't have three to 10 major museums here. We don't have 20 commercial galleries that are selling art to a huge collector base. We have a ton of artists

here, and they make a lot of work, and they show that work through whatever means possible." Regardless of what awaits Austin's art scene, the work of Big Medium and EAST has been decisive in organizing the city's creative forces. It is to Little, Swec, and Phillips' great credit that undiscovered artists are able to contribute to an established community and launch arts enterprises all their own. We look forward to participating in EAST's continued success and to begin nurturing the





# An 'In' at EAST

#### FINDING ARTISTS WHO FOUND THEIR PLACE IN EAST AUSTIN

The old Goodwill distribution center on Springdale Road in East Austin stands gutted and open to a windy Sunday morning. Construction dust layers the grounds, the flat light and damp air giving the scene a sense of imminence. "This whole building is going to be the new headquarters for Big Medium, which puts on EAST," sign maker Joe Swec says. "But it's also going to be a massive art complex."

Swec's studio shows up as location No. 89 in the catalog for the 2012 East Austin Studio Tour, which continues through Nov. 18. On the page is an image of a black-and-white triangular sign with the words "Caution: Bad Art Beyond This Point" dangling below. One stick figure appears to be screaming in terror; another is keeled over, throwing up.

"I love that my page is in the front of the catalog," Swec says, "like everything after it is bad art."

The sense of humor and craft that Swec displays in the piece caused me to stop on his page, but I arrange to meet him because his bio describes the way original works, in his case hand-painted signs, help define an environment. It just so happens that Swec's sister Jana and brother-in-law Shea Little are helping to define the East Austin artistic community as two of the founding members of EAST ("Dawn in the EAST," p.42).

A second instance of Southwestern synchronicity happens to me later in the catalog when I come upon a photo of a Saguaro cactus, fashioned in cardboard relief (No. 170). I texted Landry McMeans: "Just saw your art in the EAST catalog. Forgot you lived here." One half of the Austin alt.country band the Lonesome Heroes, McMeans has appeared in various other towns I've lived in over the last half decade. During the three- or four-week breaks from touring, she works on her art. While the band's schedule is exhausting, McMeans says it pays the bills, and it's landed her a number of commissions through the West and Southwest.

McMeans and I bike over to Barry George's sculpture studio (No. 180) to view his found-object constructions. Then we head to the Super! Alright! studio (No. 163), where she admires the flat ("almost paintby-numbers") colors of some prints, before we go back to her studio, playing Frogger over Cesar Chavez Street.

To be clear, Swec does not think the artworks on the pages after his are bad. In fact, he works with many of them. We visit Blue Genie Art Industries (No. 91), the fabrication plant on Springdale, and the expansive studio grounds of mixed media artist Sunyong Chung (No. 93a) and Philippe Klinefelter (No. 94).



At Blue Genie, Clay Shortall's Shadow Puppet, recently returned from an exhibition in New York City's Chelsea neighborhood, uses a camera and a computer program to mimic the movements of onlookers and passersby in rows of plastic circles, cut there in the factory.

Chung and Klinefelter reveal the parts and process of a gigantic collaborative work commissioned by the Asian American Cultural Center on Jollyville Road. Jung-ok Chung, Sunyong's mother, displays her fiber works and embroidery in a long, peaceful space in the back of the lot (93b).

Having moved to Austin four years ago with only the desire to be creative, Swec, a former structural engineer, credits his family with providing him inroads to the kind of work he does now. But he says that Austin is the kind of town where a person can pretty much do anything he wants and find people who will support it. "I don't think it's hard to find [an in] if you're looking," Swec says.





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# EXHIBITIONISM

#### The Pain and the Itch

Hyde Park Theatre, 511 W. 43rd, 479-7529 www.capitalt.org Through Nov. 24 Running time: 2 hr., 15 min.

There are some things in life you can count on. One of them is that a fantastic set is in store when attending a show at Hyde Park Theatre - especially when that show is produced by either HPT itself or Capital T Theatre, a company that frequently treads the tiny venue's boards. With The Pain and the Itch, though, Capital T Artistic Director Mark Pickell (who doubles as the production's set designer) has outdone himself. Before a single word is spoken, we're transported to the open-concept abode that will serve as the backdrop for the remainder of the evening - a world where every detail is key. And just as Pickell's set (lit with equaled nuance by Patrick Anthony) pays incredible attention to subtle detailing that will frame the shadowy events to come, so too does the imminent production brim with nuance.

I wasn't surprised when Capital T announced that it would program The Pain and the Itch, which falls squarely into the Tracy Lettsian aesthetic that has by now become quite familiar to the company's patrons. From Killer Joe to Bug to its most recent production, Exit, Pursued by a Bear, Capital T has proudly carried the torch of the Dysfunctional Family Drama throughout its six-year history. And while neither Bear nor Itch guite lives up to Letts' works in terms of writing for the subgenre (what does?), Pickell and crew have established a solid track record for exposing many a seedy innard. But unlike the trashy motel room aesthetic that seeps from many of Capital T's "dysfunctional" plays, The Pain and the Itch (penned by Pulitzer winner Bruce Norris, author of the acclaimed Clybourne Park) doesn't take its audience into a space that causes the skin to crawl simply by virtue of its setting. Here, the lines are strikingly sleek. The decor is tasteful, the place spotless. Too spotless. Thanksgiving dinner is ready. And all hell is about to break loose.

Although there were, for me, some confusing moments along the ride (as well as a few somewhat flat "surprises"),

the evening can be summed up in one cliche: "You'll laugh, you'll cry." Norris is especially adept at evoking a broad range of emotions from his characters (and, at least on the night I attended, from his audience). And the characters in Capital T's production are played by some of Austin's finest. Itch doesn't boast the gravitas of sister play August: Osage County, but thanks to this cast and creative team, it does take one to unique places on the same map. It's a journey very much worth taking (but leave the kids at home). - Adam Roberts

Toil and Trouble: A Troubling Turn on Shakespeare's Macbeth Salvage Vanguard Theater. 2803 Manor Rd., 573-2540 www.troublepuppet.com Through Nov. 18 Running time: 1 hr., 55 min.

Toil and Trouble, Trouble Puppet Theater Company's adaptation of Macbeth, seems almost inevitable. The company's bread and butter has been reinterpreting classic texts from the gritty muckraking of Upton Sinclair to the fantasies of Mary Shelley – and revealing a new depth to the works that can be found only when you see all of the characters as puppets. And Connor Hopkins, the company and production's leader, understands that what makes puppets work is also what makes Macbeth work: manipulation.

From the play's opening scene, in which the glowing, inhuman faces of the Witches fly through the air - an effect that appears eerily authentic when done by puppets - it's clear that the parallel between the way that the human puppeteers control the actions of their articulated subjects and the way that Lady Macbeth, the Witches, and Macbeth himself manipulate those around them is very much on Hopkins' mind. In Toil and Trouble, the cast is costumed so as to be nearly invisible. The members who control the Witches wear fully masked, black bodysuits; others are dressed in dark, hooded robes - save for Zac Crofford, who stars as Macbeth, and Caroline Reck, as Lady Macbeth. Those two keep their faces uncovered, and granting audiences the opportunity to see who controls the characters' actions drives home the point that their actions are being guided by forces beyond their control.

That's something Toil and Trouble makes clear in other ways, as well. In this telling of the story, the supernatural elements aren't allegorical. The Witches fly and float, disincorporate parts of their bodies, and disappear



at will; Banquo's ghost is less a symbol of Macbeth's shame than a true glowing apparition; the spookiness of Macbeth becomes genuine magic in Toil and Trouble, inherently believable because of the unreality of the puppets. We've already seen the giant creatures pulling the strings. What's to keep us from believing the Witches' prophecies are fact?

Toil and Trouble succeeds on a number of levels. It's technically gorgeous, with a multileveled set that uses projected backgrounds to suggest the depth of the world its characters inhabit. The spooky atmosphere is maintained by Buzz Moran's sound design and Graham Reynolds' score, aided by a surfeit of dry ice. The articulation of the puppets remains stunning (the fight choreography, as Macbeth wields his mace, is particularly striking), and Hopkins' casting - with savvy twists like using the childlike voice of Gricelda Silva to speak as King Duncan - is both highly effective and surprising. Trouble Puppet is on a hell of a roll, maintaining a level of consistency over the past several years that should be the envy of many Austin companies. On Toil and Trouble, the real magic at work is once again finding a way to enhance the humanity of an oft-told story by replacing the humans with blue-faced puppets.

#### Antigone Casa de Luz, 1701 Toomey www.ohdragontheatre.wix.com/ ohdragontheatre Through Nov. 18 Running time: 1 hr., 30 min.

Austin audiences are no strangers to unknown variables. New theatre companies tend to pop up in our fertile town like bluebonnets by Mopac in March. Nonetheless. I felt a bit disoriented as I sat in a folding chair at Casa de Luz to see Antigone, the first offering from Oh Dragon

Theatre Company, freshly hatched by a cluster of recent St. Edward's theatre grads. With no basis for comparison – no past seasons from the company, few past roles from its actors, and no past directing work from Nathan Brockett (his acting talent is well-known) – Antigone was a big unknown. The production boasts some pleasant surprises - namely a terrific performance from Danielle Evon Ploeger in the title role - but overall, it's an uneven debut for Oh Dragon.


We know the ancient tragedy of Antigone, that wretched daughter of King Oedipus: After her brothers Polynices and Eteocles kill each other in a civil war, their tyrannical uncle Creon makes an example of traitorous Polynices by refusing to bury his body, a grave affront to the gods, family, and spirit of the dead. Antigone, determined to do the right thing, throws earth over the body, and Creon punishes her with death.

This production cuts and rearranges the English translation of Jean Anouilh's 1944 French adaptation of Sophocles'

fifth century BC original. Though the narrative flows smoothly in performance, I wondered why Brockett, who aimed to reduce Anouilh's text to "building blocks as perfectly simple and complex as love, hate, loyalty, betrayal, and fate," chose not to write his own version. Using Anouilh's existential Antigone in a production meant to eradicate political shadings and highlight familial emotions seems problematic. For Anouilh, Antigone's death wasn't self-sacrifice in the name of reverence, love, and loyalty, but rather

> an action devoid of significance, a selfish inevitability. As the Chorus says, "In a tragedy, nothing is in doubt and everyone's destiny is known. That makes for tranquility."

Oh Dragon's Antigone has moments of beauty and clarity that reinforce its actor-centric mission, notably several detached, gritty speeches from Anna Schatte's Chorus and Kel Sanders' hand-wringing turn as a nervous guard. As Antigone, Ploeger fills

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

## Do You Hear the People Drink?

Texans, historically, can come together across all political lines on two things: freedom and beer. Imagine my dismay upon my recent homecoming when I discovered that I could pick up bottles at the grocery store from brewpubs west in Oregon (Deschutes) to east in Delaware (Dogfish Head) - but I could not bring home any beer made by Austin-based Uncle Billy's Brew and Que. Could this really be illegal, just like selling meth and people?

"Our state prides itself on its pro-business regulatory environment, but here is an instance in which antiquated laws are decidedly anti-business." said Scott Metzger, head of the Texas Craft Brewers Guild's Legislative Committee and founder of Freetail Brewing Company in San Antonio. The brewpub legislation prohibits Texas brewpubs from selling their wares to wholesalers who sell to my grocery store, without imposing that same restriction on brewpubs based elsewhere. "Absolutely this should be changed," Metzger believes. "Why would we not want a Texas brewpub to grow into the next Dogfish Head?" he said, referring to one of the best-known craft brewers in the country.

Meanwhile, Texas breweries have the inverse retail restriction: While brewpubs can't sell their beer outside of their restaurants, breweries can't sell in their own space

"You cannot buy beer at a brewery! No growlers, six-packs or bombers to-go, and you can't just buy a pint and hang out," said Leslie Sprague, media spokesperson for Open the Taps (www.openthetaps.org). This "grassroots organization of craft beer consumers" currently advocates for these six legislative goals:

- 1) Allow breweries to sell a portion of their beers directly to the public.
- 2) Allow brewpubs to distribute their beers to wholesalers.
- 3) Update licensing for out-of-state breweries to make it easier for smaller breweries to come.
- 4) Promote beer tourism, and eliminate the 24-ounce serving limit at beer festivals.
- 5) Permit consumers to bring more than a case of beer into Texas from out-of-state breweries for personal consumption.
- 6) Allow establishments with liquor licenses to sell growlers. Currently, growler sales are limited to places that have a beer and wine license only, which excludes bars.

Equal opportunity drinkers have probably noticed that Texas wineries are allowed to sell their goods in their tasting rooms, while breweries and distilleries may not. Wine statutes were reformed in 2001, after which the underdog Texas wine industry doubled production. According to a recent economic impact study issued by the Texas Craft Brewers Guild, even if the craft beer industry doesn't post higher growth rates due to Texans' cultural preference for beer, reforms would net an extra \$5.6 billion in economic growth and nearly 52,000 jobs in breweries and related industries in less than eight years. "There is a lot of economic growth and jobs that the state is missing out on by restricting our breweries," deadpanned Metzger.



The politics aren't even being played out by the politicians. As The Austin Chronicle has reported before, the

**Wholesale Beer Distributors** of Texas lobby group has opposed these changes in order to "preserve the independent

American three-tier system." WBDT holds that these laws violate the principle of separation among producers, distributors, and retailers, a principle that absolutely no political party holds. Accordingly, WBDT contributes to campaigns of candidates regardless of party affiliation, including the very ones who have proposed legislation WBDT opposes.

These laws were intended to help increase alcohol industry competition after Prohibition, when mobsters had monopolized the production, distribution channels, and points of sale, Today, startup breweries chafe under the limitations. But lobbyists on their behalf, such as the Texas Craft Brewers Guild and Open the Taps, have not had the resources to make campaign contributions that would guarantee an audience with lawmakers.

"Citizens need to reach out," said Sprague. In these two months between the elections and the start of the biennial legislative session, state representatives and senators need to know whether constituents care about beer statutes more than the WBDT does, or if they should let these bills be killed by special interests as they have in the past three sessions. Your civic duty doesn't have to end in the voting booth.

# food-o-file

As someone who's been eating Mueller family barbecue since my dad first took me there as a kid in the Sixties, I was saddened and disappointed when their family drama erupted online the week of Halloween. I wasn't moved to hysteria and threats like the rabid barbecue fanboys, but I love a good rehabilitation and redemption story as much as the next person and, as a recovering alcoholic, I need to believe in second chances. I think that's why I was among the legion of folks who wanted to believe in John Mueller's barbecue resurrection.

After talking to siblings **LeAnn Mueller** and Wayne Mueller, I have a pretty clear picture of the financial mismanagement allegations LeAnn turned over to police, and what prompted her to take over the business, which she bought from John's original investors early this year. I also heard Wayne's version of John's financial mismanagement at the original family restaurant after Bobby Mueller's retirement - behavior that precipitated John's original departure from Taylor 12 years ago. "We tried to convince our parents to prosecute then, but they didn't want to put their son in prison. Maybe if they had, he wouldn't have been able to get away with this kind of thing again," Wayne told me. Multiple financial judgments against John, stemming from ventures on Manor Road and in Bastrop, are a matter of public record. After the Texas Monthly cover story that skyrocketed John to statewide acclaim earlier this year, the family allegations add a darker layer and make it pretty clear that the story of mended fences, sobriety, and reconciliation was just a fairy tale.

So here is what I can say for sure: Small business owners have fiduciary responsibilities to lots of people - investors, banks, credit card companies, landlords, employees, purveyors, the state (sales tax), and federal governments (payroll taxes). If someone isn't paying attention to those responsibilities, even prosperous businesses can fail. Not everyone who opens a restaurant possesses the complete skill set that includes producing great food, managing people, and keeping track of finances, and that's why such a high percentage of restaurants fail.

LeAnn Mueller has taken over operation of the business at 1502 S. First and renamed it La Barbecue "Cuisine Texicana": she's also hired former Franklin Barbecue employee John Lewis to run the pit and his barbecue is just fine, thank you very much. The bark on the brisket isn't as peppery as it was on John's, or the fat as caramelized as it is at Franklin. Lewis' house-made sausage is a little greasy for my personal taste, but plenty of spice hits you in the back of the throat, and the casing is good and snappy. The gargantuan beef ribs need a little more black pepper to suit me. I really don't know John Lewis or how long he's been cooking barbecue, but I'm hesitant at this point to refer to him as a pitmaster, fanboy hyperbole notwithstanding. Despite threats of boycotts, lines have been consistently strong and customers appear satisfied every time I've driven by. Free cold Lone Star is still a feature of the operation. If LeAnn Mueller is as good as her word and consistently puts out the kind of exemplary barbecue for which her family is famous, she should do just fine.



# The Great Texas Holiday Pie Migration

Bud Royer's plan to deliver pies from the heart of Texas to people displaced by Superstorm Sandy

Anyone who knows Bud Royer can tell you that he's a man who is never without a maxim. Sayings that appeal to and inspire him are plastered all over the interior walls of the tiny Royers Round Top Cafe, the company's website, and its Facebook page. The operative Bud-ism for the opening of this story is an anonymous quote that says, "Some men dream of worthy accomplishments, while others stay awake and do them."

On the night of Thursday, Nov. 1, Bud and Karen Royer were watching news reports of the devastation wrought by Hurricane Sandy along the coasts of New Jersey and New York. Karen turned to Bud and suggested they prepare the Royers' annual Thanksgiving feast and figure out a way to serve it to 1,000 people who had lost their homes to the storm and weren't likely to be back in their homes in time for the holiday. By Friday morning, Bud felt he had a pretty good handle on the logistics involved in preparing a multicourse feast (roast turkey, cornbread stuffing, giblet gravy, congealed cranberry salad, whipped sweet potatoes, and Karen's pumpkin pie), packing it up, and trucking it to the Northeast. By the end of the first day, however, he realized that with a mail-order pie operation already in place, it made much better sense to donate enough pies to feed 5,000 people rather than dinner for 1,000. The great Texas pie migration of 2012 was on its way.

The next hurdle, of course, would be finding money to fund the endeavor. Donating food to worthy causes or participating in benefits is nothing new for restaurateurs; they get asked to do it all the time. According to Bud's calculations, this particular donation was going to cost about \$15,000 in food, labor, truck rental, and transportation. "I know our cafe patrons' hearts, and I was sure they would want to help underwrite the project," he explained, "but getting the information out to everyone, explaining the plan, asking for donations, and getting the money collected was going to take several days we just didn't have." So on Saturday morning, Royer approached longtime business colleague and CEO of the Dallas Market Center, Bill Winsor, who makes it a habit to eat at the cafe when visiting his ranch near Lexington. "I called Bill on his cell and told him about our plan. He immediately grasped what we were trying to do and said the Market Center would underwrite the whole thing," Royer recalled. The appropriate Bud-ism here is: "Common men binding together to reach uncommon goals!"

The plan to drive 650 homemade pies to New Jersey and New York and distribute them to relief agencies and soup kitchens was in place by Monday afternoon. Bud's friend Doug Runyan, a sales representative for Source One Marketing, had signed on as Bud's driving partner in the rented Dodge







Sprinter procured by another cafe customer. Steve and Amy Simmons of Amy's Ice Cream offered to loan Bud some insulated packing bags their company uses to transport frozen ice cream so it wouldn't be necessary to rent a refrigerated truck.


Bud and Doug will pack up 650 frozen pies on Sunday, Nov. 18, and hit the road. While the guys are driving to the East Coast, their wives will fly up and meet them there on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving. At this point, it's still unclear exactly where they'll be dropping off the pies, but the targets are the Jersey Shore, Staten Island, and Rockaway, Long Island. "We've mapped out those areas and expect to drop 100-150 pies across five to seven stops along a route," Royer said.

Once he had a workable plan in place for the pies and their preparation was set motion, Bud turned his attention to finding a way to enhance each donation and involve his big-hearted cafe clientele at the same time. This was where the gift cards came in. At first, Bud considered putting a \$25 gift card in each pie box, but he realized it was unlikely that whole pies would be distributed to a single person or one family, but rather portioned out as part of some larger holiday meal. Gift cards would have to be distributed at each stop along their route. Bud installed a link on the Royers Round Top Cafe store website to make it possible for his vast cafe and mail-order clientele to donate \$25 toward the purchase of gift cards while ordering their own holiday pies. The link (store.royersroundtopcafe.com) has only been

up since Nov. 9, and Royer's customers have already donated enough money for more than 200 gift cards. Because Visa and Mastercard are unable to waive card fees, Royer is considering Lowe's, Home Depot, Target, and/or Walmart cards and is working out the details this week. "We need to have the gift cards in hand by Monday, the 19th, in order for Karen and Janis to bring them when they fly up to meet us," he explained. Based on the response so far, it looks like that won't be a problem.

While Bud is busy making the connections to bring his holiday pie distribution dream to fruition, regular holiday business is ongoing here in Central Texas, where the Royers' commissary kitchen in Giddings will ship out more than 2,000 pies to regular customers before Thanksgiving. The Round Top Cafe and the new Royers Pie Haven across the street in Henkel Square Market will sell several hundred more. At this point, the "pies for hurricane relief story" is only half told, but Bud also has a plan for its completion. He's arranged for crews to film the load-up and departure, as well as the arrival and distribution on the other end. We'll be following Bud's grand pie adventure in our On the Range blog over the coming week, and we'll post the video as soon as it's available. The Bud-ism that seems most appropriate here is: "There is no limit to what you can accomplish if you don't care who gets the credit."

Royers Round Top Cafe is on Main Street in Round Top, Texas, about 70 miles east of Austin.

#### Fine dining at Austin's Downtown hotel restaurants

It's no secret that hotels in Central Texas are booked up for the Circuit of the Americas Formula One race in Austin this weekend. However, the well-kept secret that international  $racing\ enthus iasts\ are\ about\ to\ discover\ is\ that\ Austin's\ premier\ Downtown\ hotels\ are\ home$ to some of our city's best fine dining venues all year round. Here, Chronicle contributors Wes Marshall, Gracie Salem, and I share our thoughts about the hotel restaurants we admire. If you're a guest at one of these hotels this weekend, we know you'll get exemplary food and service. And if you're an Austinite, we suggest you check out any or all of these establishments when there aren't 150,000 extra people in town for the weekend. - Virginia B. Wood

#### The W Hotel: Trace at the W 200 Lavaca. 542-3600: www.whotelaustin.com

The "whatever, whenever" service model for which W Hotels are famous is sure to be tested on F1 weekend, what with international iet-setters swarming Downtown. As always. Trace will be providing guests with an authentic taste of Central Texas, with many items of produce, meats, cheeses, condiments, teas, wines, beers, and spirits sourced from Austin area producers. In fact, the W is the only hotel in town with a full-time forager on staff. When we spoke last week, Valerie Broussard was rounding up broccoli from three different farms and increasing her Zhi Tea order to accommodate more hot tea drinkers. Chef de

cuisine Ben Hightower's Louisiana background is reflected in the new fall menu just now in place. Appetizers such as blue crab hushpuppies with remoulade (\$15) and dirty rice stuffed quail (\$15), followed by grilled whole fish paired with spicy broccoli, crispy shallots, and olive relish (\$28) or a cowboy rib-eye (\$35) are sure to satisfy. Pastry chef Janina O'Leary's breakfast pastries will be ready for guests to grab as they depart the hotel for a day at the track. And her irresistible fall desserts (\$9) such as pumpkin whoopie pies, Drunken Doughnuts with chocolate tequila sauce, and banana pudding with salted peanut ice cream will be waiting seductively when they return.



The W's comfortable ground-floor patio dining area and sexy Living Room Bar are bound to be packed this weekend, because they're great places to hang out, Downtown-style, before or after concerts at ACL's Moody Theater, or any other evening on the town. Head libationist Joyce Garrison's custom cocktails are among the best in town, and we're told she's created some race-themed drinks in honor of F1 guests. However, Garrison and her staff would gladly whip up a Curva Grande, Green Hell, or Hairpin anytime you visit the W. All that's required is the request.

#### **Hyatt Regency Austin: Southwest Bistro**

Over the summer, this international hotelier announced a new companywide food service initiative – "Food. Thoughtfully Sourced. Carefully Served." - that would encompass everything from planting herb gardens on hotel properties to reducing portion sizes, from local sourcing of seasonal ingredients to composting and recycling. Southwest Bistro introduced the local sourcing aspect of the program at a farmers' market-style cocktail party in late July, and Executive Chef Paul French is maintaining relationships with the vendors showcased at that party. That means the dishes on his fall menu feature vegetables sourced from Johnson's Backyard Garden and John Lash's Farm to Table, cheese from Brazos Valley and Pure Luck, pork from Richardson Farms, and Strube Ranch wagyu beef.

The Hyatt's Marker 10 bar overlooking Lady Bird Lake keeps Jester King beer on draft at all times and has added several more local craft brews for F1 guests. They're also featuring cocktails made with Texas distilled spirits, and they offer one of the best happy hour deals in town from 4-7pm Sunday through Thursday, with \$3 drafts, \$5 glasses of house wine, and halfpriced appetizers. In addition, the sushi bar is open from 5-10pm Tuesday through Saturday with live jazz as an accompaniment. The coolest thing to look for at the Hyatt this week will be a custom chocolate race car created by Executive Pastry Chef Elisa Torres and her assistants Lyndi Modica and Liliana Toro. It will be on display in the lobby from Nov. 14-18. That should start a few engines! - V.B.W.

#### Stephen F. Austin: **Stephen F's Bar & Terrace**

701 Congress, 457-8800; www.austin.intercontinental.com

One of the best places to people-watch from above Austin's main thoroughfare is the bar terrace at the InterContinental Stephen F. Austin Hotel. The second-floor outdoor perch wraps around the corner of Seventh and Congress, where activity should be in high gear from two in the afternoon until two in the morning all F1 weekend. The hotel reports that it is fully booked (no surprise), with most guests arriving Thursday and checking out Monday. The bar should be packed with guests diving into the recently revamped bar menu. Standout dishes include a hamachi crudo appetizer with cashews and a huckleberry gastrique, bison sliders with coriander mayonnaise, and truffled macaroni and cheese. A bar table can be covered with small plates to share, such as a cheese plate from Antonelli's, roasted olives with thyme, and house-made charcuterie.

For dinner, a Texas Kobe burger with brie would hit the spot after a long day, as would a risotto with rock shrimp, English peas, and sea urchin, or a fun and simple grilled sandwich with provolone and Gruyère cheeses paired with a creamy cup of poblano bisque.

Full lunch and dinner service is available downstairs at the Roaring Fork, but be advised, as with anywhere else in Downtown Austin this weekend: If you're not a hotel guest, trying to elbow into this crowd for one of those divine "Big Ass" cheeseburgers is best reserved for another day. Solid food and a fun drink list will be there after our F1 visitors have gone.

#### Four Seasons Hotel: **TRIO Restaurant** 98 San Jacinto, 685-8300 www.triorestaurantaustin.com

The Four Seasons Hotel will be another of the busiest places in Austin this weekend, and the lakefront TRIO restaurant will surely be packed around the clock, from breakfast (starting at 6:30am on weekdays) to late-night dinner (until 11pm). Get up early and choose from a menu broken down into cute categories: Complete, featuring simple fare; Classic, including omelettes, pancakes, eggs Benedict, and waffles: Local, with enchilidas de migas and the farmers' market breakfast; or Healthy, with plenty of oats and egg whites. Lunch features soups, chilled seafood appetizers, and salads, with the steak salad being the standout, featuring arugula, roasted pumpkin, a house-made cheese, and a chile vinaigrette. Sandwiches include the TRIO BLT on brioche, a prime beef burger, or a salmon burger with grilled onions. The Power Lunch is intriguing, with healthy proteins such as grouper, snapper, or lean steak, all served with a light starch and local vegetables. New chef de cuisine Grant Macdonald's dinner menu is decidedly dressed up, with a mixed chilled seafood appetizer, pork terrine, a trio of wedge salads with different dressings, and many main course offerings: from as simple as a locally sourced Dewberry Hills Farms chicken with lemon and thyme, to as complex as braised beef cheek with roasted and crispy onions. Sides are chosen individually; think olive oil mashed potatoes, grilled asparagus, creamed spinach, or broccolini.

Keep in mind - the beloved and affordable happy hour in the lively Four Seasons bar will not be offered F1 weekend; just the regular three squares will be available. Call ahead for hours and availability; visitors will need a reservation and should be prepared for a stiff penalty for cancellation. However, the food and service are always top notch. TRIO gives you every reason in the world to take a table. - G.S.

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#### Hilton Austin: Finn & Porter and Liberty Tavern 500 E. Fourth, 482-8000 www3.hilton.com

We've never had anything but delicious meals at Finn & Porter, the Hilton's fine dining establishment. From the very start, the Hilton has combined two restaurants in this space, one for sushi and the other for cuttingedge American cuisine. Sushi chef Triet Huynh creates fascinating signature dishes like Lobsteryaki, a lobster tail poached in vanilla butter with cucumbers, dried cranberries, and foie gras, then rolled in rice suffused with saffron (\$28.25). While he has

invented a fascinating group of rolls, his nigiri and sashimi versions show his abilities best. Chef Peter Maffei runs the main restaurant,

and he is going an extra step to prove to the local community that he's more than just a corporate chef; he works with the Go Texan program and includes several dishes utilizing ingredients from Texas producers. One of our favorite creations is the Thai-spiced jumbo lump crab cake with a jicama and red pepper slaw and a mango coulis (\$15.25). The wine list is short but nicely chosen, including



delightful bargains like the Falanghina dei Feudi di San Gregorio (\$32) and Segura Viudas Brut Reserva Cava (\$28).

The Loft Bar is normally a quiet, elegant place, but depending on the time of year, it can be as loud as a Friday night at a frat house, especially during Longhorn home games. The Hilton also has a casual dining outlet called Liberty Tavern - mainly a soup-salad-sandwich spot with some added entrees, such as a

roasted chicken and a flat-iron steak. Their most interesting dish is the Lone Star Burger, with smoked Fredericksburg sausage, red chili barbecue sauce, topped with fried jalapeños, pepper jack cheese, and chipotle ketchup (\$15.25). Liberty Tavern's new focus is on craft beers, and they feature a generous selection of fine Texas brews. You can wash your burger down with a (512) Pecan Porter (\$6), an Austin Beerworks Pearl-Snap (\$7), or any of a dozen other Texas beers. - W.M.

#### The Driskill Hotel: Driskill Grill and 1886 Cafe & Bakery

Since 1999 and the arrival of David Bull as executive chef, the Driskill Grill has had a national reputation as a destination restaurant. When Bull left, Josh Watkins took over and maintained the high standards. Both are now running world-class restaurants - Bull at Congress, and Watkins at The Carillon Restaurant. The current chef, Jonathan Gelman, has a brilliant background working in some of the top restaurants in the western U.S.

The Driskill Grill is a quiet, elegant place to dip into cutting-edge cuisine. Their best value is the nightly, four-course, farm-to-table meal (\$55 or \$95 with wine pairing). Wine lovers will find a well-stocked cellar with prized wines such as Château Cheval Blanc, Château Mouton Rothschild, and several vintages of Ridge Monte Bello. The list isn't aimed at the impecunious; prices start around \$35 and escalate rapidly. But the list of Old World wines is one of Austin's heftiest, and it also offers quite a few of Texas' best wines.

Food at the Driskill was famous all over Texas long before chefs Bull, Watkins, or Gelman were bringing honors to the institution; its first brush with fame came when the legendary Helen Corbitt reigned over the kitchen. Sadly, by 1969, the hotel had seemingly seen its best days; furnishings had been sold, and it was scheduled for demolition. The Heritage Society of Austin raised over \$500,000 (about \$2.5 million in today's money) to stop the wrecking balls. At the same time, they established the 1886 Lunchroom and began serving weekday lunches to Downtown business types. Now known as the 1886 Cafe and Bakery, it is downstairs on the Sixth Street side of the building. Ms. Corbitt's Cheese Soup is still on the menu, and one taste reveals why her food was famous. The more recently celebrated dish here is the Hangover Burger, a cross between breakfast and lunch that includes a thick slab of beef, a slice of cheddar cheese, brown sugar and chili-rubbed bacon, a sunny-side-up egg, and a crispy sheet of hash browns, all served on a whole wheat bun. Since you've already blown any semblance of a diet, might as well finish it all off with a dulce de leche milk shake (\$6). - Wes Marshall

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
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

## **Viewed From the Future**

PHOTOGRAPHER SANDY CARSON'S FOUND FILM

Sandy Carson is a space explorer. He's a photographer by trade (one quite familiar in the halls of the *Chronicle*, actually, as a long-time contributor), and a Scot by birth. But he's spent the better part of his life touring the U.S. on his bicycle, peering into spaces otherwise left for dead, to find memories of things past, not unlike the way *The New Yorker*'s late writer Joseph Mitchell collected artifacts of the city's crumbling architecture.

"I'm always rummaging around derelict buildings and abandoned houses wherever I am," Carson says.

Whereas Mitchell focused on odds and ends, like nails and doorknobs, Carson considers a stack of old photo slides or misplaced Super 8 footage a real score. He's looking for evidence of that American Dream he saw depicted in photos and films when he was a kid.

"America just had a different light," he says. "And when I finally got over here, the light looked just like in the pictures."

Recently, Carson gathered a selection of Super 8 and 8-millimeter films onto a single

digital reel, piecing together his own portrait of the American Dream, fashioned from long rows of palm trees, swimming pools, and Ford Fairlanes. The six-minute film shows as a projection this Friday at the University of Texas' Visual Arts Center, as an addendum to the opening of his photography show "Yet, By No Means," with Emma Whelan. (See austinchronicle.com/blogs for an interview with Whelan and Carson.)

Strung together randomly, the footage exudes the inherent irony of its discovery. Presumedly, the people who captured these rather banal moments believed them to be important. Or perhaps, like so many of us shooting endless video on our smartphones, these amateur cinematographers were too fascinated with the functionality of the technology to question its usefulness, creating reams of instantly dead content. These moments are captured on film, but lost forever to the viewer behind the lens. Either way, the footage has been collecting dust, and without context, it's meaningless to most of us.

But Carson is the anti-Bartleby; that is, unlike that dead letter office scrivener, Carson sees purpose in the pursuit. He runs the footage together, then overlays ambient music with space exploration transmissions. I picture his descendants rummaging through homes centuries from now in space suits, space bikes parked outside.

# **Getting the Shot**

CINEMA CLUB AND LOUIS BLACK CELEBRATE SAMUEL FULLER'S CENTENARY WITH 'FORTY GUNS'

The first time we see Jessica Drummond, who is played by Barbara Stanwyck, she's dressed in black, riding a white stallion, and leading a swarm of forty men on forty horses. The galloping hooves kick up quite a dust cloud as they descend through the black-andwhite CinemaScope frame into the tiny Western outpost of Tombstone, Ariz., and nearly obliterate the image on the other side of the frame – a buckboard wagon, which is carrying the three Bonnell brothers to town. It's a study in contrasts that will continue throughout Forty Guns: the domineering woman who gives as good as she gets and the pacifist man who has no desire to kick up any dust.

Forty Guns is one of the great Sam Fuller's best movies, and it is being presented this Sunday at the Alamo Drafthouse's Cinema Club by The Austin Chronicle Editor Louis Black in honor of the centenary of Fuller's birth. Of all the filmmakers that we've written about throughout the Chronicle's 31 years of existence, I'd wager that few have received more ink than Fuller. The films of Sam Fuller

are a love affair that Louis and I nurtured through our pre-Chronicle years as graduate students writing program notes for CinemaTexas, the former student-run, film-exhibition program at the University of Texas. I'm happy to note that we're still singing the praises of Sam Fuller.

One of the most adept of the B-movie makers, Fuller brought his background as a soldier, newspaperman, and pulp-novel writer to the world of his films. Punchy and iconoclastic, Fuller's films buck the norms. Often, they seem to play both sides against the middle, allowing no parties to corner the truth. He sets up a conflict and lets the pieces fall where they may. Europeans might call it a dialectic, and it's no wonder the voung French New Wave critics and filmmakers championed Fuller's movies. It's in Jean-Luc Godard's Pierrot le Fou that Fuller makes a cameo appearance as a party guest and utters what has become his most quoted line: "The cinema is like a battleground. Love ... hate ... action ... violence ... death. In a word: emotion."



Released in 1957, Forty Guns caps Fuller's first decade as a filmmaker. As described above, the opening scene sets the stage for the archetype-busting that's yet to come. The implication is that Stanwyck's Jessica Drummond owns those 40 men and what they're packing, within and without their holsters. Griff Bonnell (Barry Sullivan) is a retired marshal who guit his life as a "legal killer" after shooting to death a young boy. But while passing through town Griff arrests Jessica's no-good brother Brockie (John Ericson), who is terrorizing the townspeople with wild gunplay. Despite this, Griff and Jessica fall in love while a violent storm kicks up around them.

"Hell if I know why people think guns are sexy," Fuller is quoted as saying in A Third Face: My Tale of Writing, Fighting, and Filmmaking. This doesn't prevent him from turning this Western into one of the great movies about girls and guns. Some of the dialogue is over the top, as when Jessica asks Griff if she can feel his gun. When he tells her no because "it might go off in your face," she tells him she'll take the chance. Another scene shows Griff's brother Wes (Gene Barry) in a gun shop discovering the girl he will marry through the sights of a rifle he is examining. Spoiler: Later, Brockie kills Wes during the wedding ceremony. "See," Fuller continues in The Third Face, "one goddamned bullet has always been decisive. from Sarajevo to Dallas." In the film's dramatic climax, Griff is compelled to kill Brockie for murdering his brother, but at the moment of their confrontation, Brockie pulls his sister Jessica in front of him and uses her as a human shield. Defying expectations, Griff indeed shoots Jessica in the leg, causing her to drop to the ground, allowing Griff a clear shot at her sorry excuse for a brother. Walking past them, Griff tells a bystander, "She'll live. It's only a flesh wound." And with that, Griff's past 10 years of pacifism are obliterated.

If Fuller had had his way, Griff would have killed Jessica in the end as well as her brother, but the studio balked. When you're shooting down shibboleths, it seems you're not allowed to take aim with a fully loaded barrel.

# **Tracking Shots**

#### New Formula One documentary '1' world premieres at the Paramount

Formula One was lethal. Between 1952 and 1994, 32 drivers died in the world championship hunt, and another six during testing. Drivers were more likely to die on the track than become world champion. Yet while it was the worst of times, many drivers and fans saw it as the best of times for the sport - fun, freewheeling, and thrilling - and new documentary 1 reaches deep into the archives to find the blood and glory on the tracks.

Even though there are more established F1 cities, producer Michael Shevloff saw Austin on the weekend of its first United States Grand Prix as the obvious choice for the world premiere. His production company, Spitfire Films, has previously screened two films at the South by Southwest Film Festival - Foo Fighters: Back and Forth in 2011 and Undefeated in 2012. Moreover, all eyes will be on the city for its inaugural United States Grand Prix. It set a tough deadline for director Paul Crowder, who was still working on the

mix less than a week before the world premiere. However, Shevloff knew the Austin Grand Prix was the right place to drop the flag. He said, "It's the race of the year, and that's what everyone's saying."

Shevloff thinks film fans who know nothing about open wheel racing will be lured in by what he calls "Dallas on four wheels." But racing buffs will see a panoramic history of an era when circuits, teams, and drivers were

in a perilous battle to be fastest, with little regard for safety. Crowder was Shevloff's top choice for director as roommates, they used to watch F1 together - but this wasn't a sentimental favor for a friend. As the editor of Riding Giants and Dogtown and Z-Boys, Crowder knew his way around sports documentaries. Shevloff said, "We designed an idea and structured something that we thought would lend itself to Paul."

The first challenge was getting access to F1's footage. Shevloff's dad knew FIA [Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile] Deputy Race Director Herbie Blash, who gave them access to F1's top man: the mercurial Bernie Ecclestone, who is notoriously protective of the sport's archives. However, Shevloff said, "We hit at the right time with the right idea and the right combination, and persuaded him that now was the time to tell this story." Still, the film could not depend solely on what F1 loaned them, since those archives only go back to 1981, when Ecclestone acquired the sport's global TV rights. Shevloff said, "We scoured the world and found what we think is the best assembly of stock footage for Formula One ever put together."

Crowder had thousands of hours of footage, plus contemporary interviews with 60 legends of the sport. It was so overstuffed that racing giants like Stirling Moss ended up on cutting room floor. The vintage footage was an embarrassment of riches from a time when filmmakers had unfettered access. Crowder mentioned pit cameraman Roy Pagliacci, who "was just following [driver] Jacky Ickx around with his Super 8 at Monza in 1978, and we were able to use some shots from that." One piece of footage would lead to another: "You keep seeing people with cameras in their hands, and you think, who's that guy? Find him, call him." The challenge wasn't finding footage so much as finding the original masters. Like a driver depends on his mechanics, Crowder credited his "team full of researchers who really know how to look for the gold, and made

the connections with the filmmakers and vendors." It all allowed Crowder to celebrate the skills of four decades of trackside cinematographers. He said, "The way they are able to rack and focus a car moving at 200 miles per hour on a long lens, all the way round the corner, to them and then on the zoom past, and keep focus all the way you don't see that kind of quality filmmaking these days."

More importantly for Crowder, finding so much footage allowed him to assemble scenes using multiple angles – a privilege unheard of for most archive-trawling documentarians, who are lucky to get anything. He said, "Whenever people have screened this footage before, you've only been able to watch it in this singular form.' Take the massive multicar crash at the 1973 British Grand Prix at Silverstone. On the day, there were six different camera teams at the track, and the research team hunted them all down. Some of the footage was truly surprising, like that of a documentarian following the drivers' wives and girlfriends. Crowder said, "Not only do we have umpteen angles to show the intensity of the accident, but we were able to show the reaction from the wives of these drivers as well." What amazed Crowder the most was the cameraman's discipline. "With an 11 car pileup behind his back, he managed to keep his camera facing toward the women and not think, 'Gee, shouldn't I be getting this accident?""



## F1 on Film

#### AS RON HOWARD READIES 'RUSH,' WE LOOK BACK AT THE BEST RACING MOVIES

The folks at the Circuit of the Americas aren't the only people gambling that Americans will become addicted to Formula One. Ron Howard is putting the finishing touches to his new drama Rush, which focuses on the rivalry and camaraderie between two giants of the sport: stoic Niki Lauda (Daniel Brühl) and charismatic playboy James Hunt (Chris Hemsworth). "It sounds kind of strange and alien, but it really isn't," he said on a recent trip to Austin. "When I talk to NASCAR fans, they know about Formula One. It's not that dissimilar. It's speed, it's risk-taking, and it's incredible competition." But if Rush is in pole position, there's a full pack of features revving their engines. Biopics of drivers Jackie Stewart and Gilles Villeneuve are planned, while Michael Mann is in talks to direct Go Like Hell, chronicling 1966's bloody engineering fight between Ferrari and Ford. Journalist Joe Saward has also discussed adapting his book The Grand Prix Saboteurs the true story of three drivers who became Nazi-fighting secret agents. If 1 and Rush are successes, expect these to hit the starting grid. But there's a fleet of veteran pics that have already passed the checkered flag.


Grand Prix (1966): John Frankenheimer pioneered the use of incar cameras for F1. But the film's most enduring image may be Eva Marie Saint, daubed in her crashed lover's blood, shrieking, "Is this what you want?!" to the paparazzi.

Le Mans (1971): Not technically an F1 film, but speed freak Steve McQueen is surrounded by F1 drivers like David Piper in this dialogue-lite drama/vanity project filmed at the 24 Hours of Le Mans auto race.


Bobby Deerfield (1977): Sydney Pollack stalled with this sudser, with Al Pacino unconvincing as either a romantic lead or a driver.

Senna (2010): There's only one argument about Ayrton Senna: Was he one of the best F1 drivers or simply the best? Asif Kapadia reconstructs the life and significance – both to the sport and to his fans - of a Brazilian icon.

Grand Prix: The Killer Years (2011): Hard to come by, but the BBC documentary is in many ways a test run for the safety and danger themes in 1.











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
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Best. DJ Gig. Ever.

Rap legend Rakim canceled his Fun Fun Fun Fest appearance for the second year in a row when Hurricane Sandy left him stranded at home in Stamford, Conn. His manager pro-

vided a photo of a massive tree blocking his driveway and reported that another one was resting on top of the vehicle he was planning on driving to Texas (Rakim is known for not using airplanes). Last year, the pioneering MC was taken off the FFF lineup due to injury. "I fully think he's jinxed for FFF," said festival booker **Graham Williams** when I emailed him begging for a third booking. "But we'll do a venue play sometime."

Set well soon, Agent Ribbons and Michael Fracasso. On Halloween, the former local duo was leaving Memphis for Dallas when they were blindsided at an intersection, leaving drummer Lauren Hess' arm broken and totaling their car. They had to cancel the last of their trek, as well as several local shows, including a dream gig opening for Tilly & the Wall. The latter's auto accident that same week was equally bad, with the angelic-voiced singer-songwriter suffering a badly broken playing hand. Chronicle music blogger William Graham - 13-year-old son of Jon Dee Graham - stages a Teen Proper Nang Night benefit for Fracasso at Maria's Taco Xpress on Saturday, with a handful of U-18 locals, plus Dum Dum Girls offshoot Cheap Curls and special guests.

- The **Boxing Lesson** collaborated with animator **Eric Power** on a video for "Better Daze," the flipside to its excellent new single "Health Is the New Drug." Combining local footage and painstaking paper animation, the clip depicts Austin as inhabited by freaky space creatures. The Boxing Lesson takes part in **NORML**'s **Sixth Street Smokeout** with **Smoke & Feathers** and more, this Saturday at the **Flamingo Cantina**.
- > After three episodes on NBC's The Voice, Austin native Suzanna Choffel exited the program with a cool rendition of Bob Marley's "Could You Be Loved." Her TV coach, country singer Blake Shelton, dismissed her song choice as being too laid back. "You don't just get to choose any song you want. There is a list of approved songs and you get to rate them," Choffel explained. "I was definitely the wild card of the show, doing folk, pop, and reggae, and that may have hurt me in the end, but it's who I am." Choffel, in contrast to most televised singing contest hopefuls, remains a songwriter and working musician, and says the experience expanded her comfort zone, though her maturity, artistic or otherwise, was no leg up. "It definitely confirmed some of my fears about the industry - how agecentric and image-centric it is - but honestly, that's an L.A. thing. I certainly don't feel that way in New York or Austin, where originality is celebrated." Choffel hits JAX Neighborhood Cafe Friday.

# **Walk Softly on This Heart of Mine**

#### Rosie Flores rescues Janis Martin

1995 was a milestone year for Rosie Flores. Rockabilly Filly traced her journey of roots reinvigoration from San Antonio to San Diego, Los Angeles, Nashville, and finally Austin, while also kickstarting the resurgence of Fifties singer Wanda Jackson. Filly's other duet teaming also lured a second rockabilly songbird out of obscurity: Janis Martin.

Jackson still enjoys the benefits of that mid-Nineties boost, which peaked last year when Jack White produced her comeback. The Party Ain't Over. Thanks to a lengthy career on Capitol Records, her firecracker repertoire of twang and country remains remembered and preserved. Almost without fail, you can find her firing up the Continental Club on an annual basis.

Janis Martin's story contrasts vividly.

As a teenager nicknamed "The Female Elvis," she signed to Presley's home label, RCA Records, in the Fifties under the watchful eye of Colonel Tom Parker. At 17, her secret came out: She'd been married for two years, and was pregnant. Despite her talent and potential, Martin was unceremoniously dropped by RCA and slipped from the spotlight for nearly 30 years.

Spurred by Rockabilly Filly, Flores also moved on, touring and recording, including 2009's acclaimed Girl of the Century for Chicago's Bloodshot Records (see "Gypsy Rose," Aug. 10, 2007). Yet her experience with Martin lingered. In 2011, she contacted her for a recording session.

Flores' instincts were sharp, as they've always been for a pioneer of the alt.country movement. She brought Janis Martin to Blanco for what became known as The Blanco Sessions. Flores' own Working Girl's Guitar was recorded in tandem, and she planned to go out on the road with both this fall.

Four months after completing The Blanco Sessions, Janis Martin died. That might have been the final chapter in a project for most musicians, but not Rosie Flores. She was determined to rewrite the ending her way.

#### Infinite Radio

Rosie Flores' office offers a cramped but organized room in the Southeast Austin duplex where she resides. A large desk and chair layered with cushions and flattened pillows lift the petite Flores to the right height to work. Behind that, there are dark wooden bookshelves teeming with scrapbooks preserving brittle yellow newspaper clippings, faded photographs, gig posters, and assorted memorabilia just as at home in a teenage girl's room as that of a professional musician.

Family and history are close to Flores' heart, evident in her conversation and the mosaic of images and objects that decorate

her home, some of it dating back to the singer's youth. She treasures these as she does the memories of growing up in San Antonio, with parents who encouraged her and her brother to sing and play. A track her father recorded of her as a child appeared on Rockabilly Filly.

"My parents were fans of jazz, Mills Brothers, Peggy Lee, and I heard American Bandstand," explains Flores, "My father was a freak for Rodgers and Hammerstein. We saw all the musicals. Not so much conjunto."

From home consoles to cars, radio filled the ether of her childhood - a vast, infinite universe of faraway stations and local shows. The stations of San Antonio and South Texas in the Fifties were a Pandora's box of farm reports, syndicated variety shows, and country or pop programs by day, often turning to R&B at night, as on KMAC, or simply playing popular hits around the clock like KONO

Elvis and Fats Domino dominated the South Texas charts, bolstered by a rich array of local and regional acts - Doug Sahm & the Markays, Publio & the Valiants, Sunny & the Sunglows – all clamoring for attention from teen audiences. Threaded through it all was a heavy bottom of slap bass, back beat, and the crooning voices of rockabilly, a sound that lingered in Flores' young memory.

When her parents Oscar and Irene moved their young family to San Diego, a new musical landscape unfolded for Rosie. Dick Dale, Beach Boys, and surf music filled her high school ears and redirected her interests.

"I had to go through the falling in love with the Beatles thing, falling in love with the Yardbirds and Jeff Beck and Stephen Stills and Jimi Hendrix and all these guitar players. I got enamored of guitar through my brother Roger, who taught me rhythm so he could practice Hendrix solos.

"Then I'd learn a few licks and knock on his door. He'd be like, 'Wow! You got that really fast!' It was easy. My fingers were already tough from playing rhythm, so it was just getting the licks. I was hungry to play guitar, and that's when Penelope's Children happened."

#### **Bubblegum Guitars**

Flores tenderly opens a scrapbook from the late Sixties detailing Penelope's Children. They were an all-girl band, a designation that carries more weight when you consider the years they performed. All-girl acts were a novelty by definition, while by 1968, the "girl group" trend was passé, belonging to the pre-Beatles era. No Internet connected them with sister acts like the Quatro sisters in Detroit (revisit "The Pleasure Seekers," July 29, 2011).



Four months after completing The Blanco Sessions, Janis Martin died. That might have been the final chapter in a project for most musicians, but not Rosie Flores.

"I got the nerve to do a talent show at school," recalls Flores, thumbing through a decades-old mimeographed program. "It got me to do the band with the girls. I sewed every one of these Sgt. Pepper's outfits for us, sewed all those psychedelic pantsuits."

At 18, Flores had her sights set high and took advantage of family still living in San Antonio to book gigs at the Pusi-Kat Club during the World's Fair in 1968. Penelope's Children billed themselves in newspaper ads as country rock and blues, which seemed to land them more gigs.

"We went on tour, opened for Creedence Clearwater Revival and the Turtles," recounts Flores. "The Turtles wouldn't let us use their gear, but Creedence would. They were so nice to us. There's a whole story here in the book I'm writing about how the guy that hired us for this non-union concert wanted us to open because we'd started to get a name in San Diego. But we had to join the union to do it. He wanted us to do it for free, said he couldn't pay union scale.

"So we went to the union, who said no, this is why we're here. The guy wanted the union people to see him give me a check for \$80, then I was supposed to hand it back. I told the union, who told me to take the check and put it in the bank, not to give it back. So I did. That chapter is called, 'Bubblegum Guitars, Worms, Dirt, and Slug Suckers.

"Soon, I started working with a different band, playing in a strip joint. We wore hot pants. Little by little, I worked my bandmembers in, but when they asked us to go topless, I quit."

#### Whole Lotta Shakin' Going On

Walking out on the porch of her pale brick duplex, the capital's rockabilly filly looks out over the sloping lawn, greener this fall than during last summer's drought. Nearby sits mosquito repellent, a necessity for being outside, even at midday. She relishes her free time here on her laptop with a cup of coffee, those rare hours not spent traveling, writing, planning, practicing, or recording.

Penelope's Children wasn't Flores' only dance with an all-girl band. In the mid-Eighties, she started the Screamin' Sirens in Los Angeles, a wild-child version of the Go-Go's with no holds barred. That paved the way for her first solo album in 1987, selftitled on Warner Bros., then discs on Hightone that led to the reckoning of Rockabilly Filly in 1995. More projects followed - a reissue of her first LP, duets with Ray Campi, a live album, then 2009's Girl of the Century.

Flores' personal scrapbook began to fill with chart action in Billboard and The Gavin Report, TV appearances on Austin City Limits, and narrating a Peabody Awardwinning radio series called Whole Lotta Shakin'. Flores' career had come full circle to reconnect with its past, like the distant crackle of a radio station coming into range.

"I love the process of producing, I just haven't had much chance," recounts Flores of the events that led to The Blanco Sessions. "When I moved here to Austin in 2006, I ran into a friend who said I could use his studio in Blanco for free. I thought, now's the time to strike. I came into a little money after my parents were gone and the house sold, so I called Janis: 'I've got the studio and money. Let's do it. Start collecting and writing songs, I'll call you after the New Year.'

"When I called her in February, I found out her son died a few weeks before, and she was so blue. In tears on the phone, she said, 'I'm going to do this for my son.' That was who she was pregnant with when she was 17 and RCA dropped her, and here she was recording again. All these years had gone by and she said, 'I'm going to do it for Kevin.'

"I got there in September [2011] and she wasn't feeling well. She said, 'Honey, I hang out in my pj's so I can take little naps.' And I said that was okay, I'd wear my pj's, too. One night in the kitchen, she broke down. She cried and said she was afraid she wasn't going to be here much longer and that this was her last record. 'I've got this lump on my back,' she told me.

"I asked her if she'd seen a doctor, and she said no. She was a heavy smoker. Two months later, she hadn't been to the doctor, but she showed up at the airport, said she didn't want to disappoint me.

"We recorded the record in two days. She sounded amazing! She started making a list of what she would do for her comeback: 'A new hairstyle; I'm gonna get my look together. I'm gonna use Big Sandy.' Just jamming on all these ideas.

"But she kept having headaches, and the next phone call was, 'I have stage four cancer.' It got her in four months."

#### **Voices Carry**

It's no coincidence Rosie Flores timed her own Working Girl's Guitar for release alongside The Blanco Sessions. All along she planned to co-promote the two.

The Blanco Sessions, poised to put Janis Martin on the Wanda Jackson comeback track, doesn't disappoint. Martin had been a star as a child, playing the *Grand Ole Opry* and weekly radio broadcasts. Though her few recordings were collectible and she'd made festival appearances, The Blanco Sessions hits the jackpot. Martin cashes in her experience with a throaty confidence that all but steals "Sweet Dreams" from Patsy Cline and trounces the Kentucky Headhunters' version of Bill Monroe's "Walk Softly on This Heart of Mine." It's a powerful statement of time and talent, not to mention a sheer pleasure to hear a 71-year-old woman singing about going steady with boys.

"I'm not giving Janis up," states her producer. "I'm taking her on the road with Marti Brom. We'll be all over the West Coast and the New York area with both records."

Brom's own reputation for rockabilly sass fits well with Martin's sultry alto. Yet Flores is committed to more than just the usual PR campaign for the new recording. Janis Martin rests in her heart, as well as life and career. Flores considers her tour plans, large dark eyes distant and soft in the hazy fall afternoon.

"When you've lost a child, and your heart is wounded and you grieve, it makes you weak," she says. "Janis was hurting and it was hard for her to fight for her life. I always felt if Kevin was alive, she would have fought for her life. Now Janis Martin lives on through her voice.

"And I hope people hear in my voice, her voice."

Rosie Flores marks the release of both her new disc and Janis Martin's along with Marti Brom at the Continental Club, Saturday, Dec. 1. Coincidentally, Wanda Jackson plays that same night at Antone's.

#### The Blanco Sessions (Cow Island Music)

There's more than a little serendipity to Janis Martin's last recordings, overseen by Rosie Flores, and said producer's latest LP both seeing the light of day nearly simultaneously. Flores revitalized the





careers of both Wanda Jackson and Martin when they appeared on her 1995 album Rockabilly Filly, and she rightly takes great pride in the fact both rockabilly pioneers received well-deserved, latter-day recognition as a result. After more than 10 years of preparation, Martin recorded The Blanco Sessions in two days in 2007, then unexpectedly passed away four months later. Labels decided against releasing the LP, mainly because of what they saw as a difficult promotional effort. The music speaks otherwise. Martin's voice possesses a timelessly sassy quality, a flawless match to songs like Dave Alvin's "Long White Cadillac" and blues classic "Roll Around Rockin'." A hillbilly band consisting of locals Dave Biller, Bobby Trimble (who also serves as co-producer), T Jarrod Bonta, and Beau Sample rises the occasion, and Kelly Willis adds simmering duet vox on "Walk Softly on This Heart Of Mine." The Blanco Sessions makes for a bittersweet farewell kiss. Flores' 11th album, Working Girl's Guitar, finds her in the driver's seat, playing all of the album's guitar parts and producing as well. Those who've followed her over the years will attest to the Austinite making music for guitar lovers, and, although at nine tracks it's all a bit too brief, this disc in no way disappoints. With the slashing chords of the title track, the deep twang of "Surf Demon #5," a bluesy sting on "If (I Could Be With You)," and a closing cover of George Harrison's "While My Guitar Gently Weeps," Rosie Flores delivers her strongest outing in years. Two of them. (Working Girl's Guitar) ★★★

# ROBERT CRAY

Sat., Dec. 15, 8pm

One World Theater

Robert Cray is a five-time GRAMMY winner whose immensely popular records helped immeasurably jump-start the contemporary blues boom that still holds sway to this day.





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#### Gary Clark Jr. Blak and Blu (Warner Bros.)

A Stax-like blare of horns, curlicue guitar hook tickling the left channel, and a barrage of steam-engine riffs pulling into the station all at once set the proverbial stage for Gary Clark Jr.'s declaration of intent on Blak and Blue fuse "Ain't Messin 'Round": "I don't believe in competition/ Ain't nobody else like me around." Two out of three ain't bad. The guitarist's full-length, major label debut messes around plenty, initial passes feeling uncannily like a corporate spaghetti-testing session. Instead of song lyrics, the CD liner notes come packed with production credits for each of the 13 songs. What will stick - blues, rock, electro soul, R&B? Shockingly, almost all of it, but it's not always pretty. If the riff fits, then Hendrix indeed rules the comparisons roost, beginning on "Ain't Messin 'Round" rejoinder "When My Train Pulls In," nicking and cobbling together hints of "Voodoo Chile" and maybe the electric gypsy's cover of "Drivin' South." In fact, the jumble of Blak and Blu, which smooths pleasurably over time, evokes Hendrix's sprawling third disc, 1968's titanic double LP Electric Ladyland, a volcanic work of primordial chaos blotting



out the sun. Blak and Blu throbs more like a lava lamp turned upside, a red-line splat of molten nightlife served on a huge sonic bed only achieved by major label productions. Approaching eight minutes, "When My Train Pulls In" could thunder for a whole album side, but that's when Blak and Blu pivots on its title track with silky New Jack soul. "Bright Lights," back from Clark's national debut, proves a welcome return, because other than musicians and labels, everyone

knows EPs rarely satisfy. Back-to-back with perhaps the best cut on Blak and Blu - the stock-car stomp "Travis County," a straightahead rave-up not overly thought, plotted, or executed - "Bright Lights" and its knock-out successor could have constituted the entire bottom line herein, but instead of a direct Are You Experienced uppercut, GCJ and WB have sought the free-flowing diversity of Axis: Bold as Love. Starting on LP midpoint "Glitter Ain't Gold (Jumpin' for Nothin')," written in part with Doyle Bramhall II, who helped sponsor Clark at Eric Clapton's 2010 Crossroads Festival in Chicago and thus the rock star fission that followed, Blak and Blu turns into a stylistic stew. The song itself opens hot and heavy, huffing Zeppelin, but four minutes later we're in contemporary R&B land. "Numb" follows with the antidote - slow blues - but its own counterbalance comes next in the pure falsetto soul of "Please Come Home" and late-night studio console companion "Things Are Changin'." Before all is lost to this modern-urban format, Clark reels it back in by mashing up Hendrix and Little Johnny Taylor with "Third Stone From the Sun/If You Love Me Like You Say." Again, one gets the sense the local could do this in his sleep, pair Albert Collins

and Bootsy Collins, or Johnny "Guitar" Watson to Little Willie John. "You Saved Me" notches pure soul filler before the National Steel blues of closer "Next Door Neighbor Blues" evokes filmmaker John Sayles' backwoods blues fable Honeydripper, which starred Clark. That leaves "The Life," written from the POV of an L.A. rock star knowing that he can't go on like this, "just getting by ... just getting high." The first verse drips with what it must be like for Gary Clark Jr. to have ridden a shooting star thus far. Approximately: "Well I wake up around 10 in the morning, feeling crazy, feeling horny/ From the night before 'cause I was up 'til four in the morning/So I take a long trip and then I take out my song strips/When I sit down to write, I always look to God to help me see the light/But I know, that I ain't been living right/And I know, that I can live by the night/But it's so hard for me just to put it down/So hard for me to pass up the crown when it's been passed down/I'm sitting on the throne and sometimes I feel in this world that I've been thrown in, not been shown in, and I don't know when to slow it down." Then the punchline: "But this is the life, life, life, life, the life."

#### Christy Hays Drought

Story songs are Christy Hays' stock-intrade, woven with a deftness and maturity through the 11



songs of her first recording, Drought. "Winter Solstice" knocks its hard-luck tale out of the ballpark, leaving a brooding, string-driven finale lingering before the next track begins. Gorgeously produced by Roy Taylor and featuring an eclectic list of musical accompanists (Craig Ross, Bukka Allen, Matt the Electrician), Hays' local debut signals her notable arrival with quiet grace ("You Don't Have To Wait," "American Car") that follows compellingly through "Birds Point Levee" and "Wendy and David." Indeed, the arrangements convey the songs, but the gritty lyrics carry their own weight and beauty in her plaintive vocals ("TVA"). With the twangy "Grocery Store Rose," she wryly dances into Jo Carol Pierce turf, a formidable place indeed: "No thorns on its stem, no bloom left within/ Some powder and string, it don't fix a thing." Drought comes up anything but dry.

#### James Hand Mighty Lonesome Man (Hillgrass Bluebilly)

James Hand makes music that went out



of style more than a half-century ago. Still, every new release from the man known as Slim seems like an event. Mighty Lonesome Man, his fifth overall and first in three years, follows the formula of his previous work. It's deeply heartfelt, Texas-bred honky-tonk, simply wrought. Plus he attracts top-shelf talent like Earl Poole Ball, Cindy Cashdollar, and Alvin Crow to play along, assuring Hand's songs sound as authentic as the man who writes them. "Lesson in Depression" and "Wish You Would Kiss Me" both serve as prime examples of what he's capable of: wide-eyed or dewy-eyed, straightforward, and delivered with a catch in his voice always bringing to mind Hank Williams Sr. "Get Rhythm," a CD bonus track, demonstrates he's got some Johnny Cash down deep as well. Forget last of a dying breed. Hand's in a genre all by himself.

The Sword Apocryphon (Razor & Tie)

#### Eagle Claw Timing of the Void (ECH)

"A foolish consistency is the hobgoblin of little minds," claimed Ralph Waldo Emerson, but in heavy metal, hobgoblins constitute a good thing. Apocryphon rolls out disc No. 4 in Austin metal torchbearer the Sword's winning streak, and it's precisely what we've come to expect from the unrepentant headbangers. Still the poster child for Seventies values (Black Sabbath), the local quartet cranks out bludgeoning rhythms, catchy riffs, and arty, fantasy lyrics from the same well of inspiration it drew on for LPs one through three. Expecting significant evolution from dinosaur lovers isn't only pointless, but undesirable. Given a perfect balance of melody and power on "Arcane Montane," "The Veil of Isis," and "Dying Earth,"

change remains beautifully avoidable. A few atmospheric Moog intros aside, Apocryphon stomps with familiar, even comforting, satisfaction. Sword touring partner Eagle Claw also rides a new horse across the landscape, axes aloft. Produced by the big brother band's Bryan Richie, sophomore full-length Timing of the Void revels in an even more openly sensual guitar orgy. Moving forward a decade with its hero worship, the instrumental quartet seems to have spent its teenage years with a pile of Dio-era Sabbath and early Metallica tapes, letting bottom-heavy licks soak into impressionable brains. The resulting sludge stays as thick and viscous as it oughta be, without clogging the gears. "Ophidian," "Book of Water," and the nearly quintessential "Uzumaki Vortex" remain graceful while hammering your skull. Dispensing with unnecessary vocals, Eagle Claw achieves headbanging purity. #### **DISGRACED BUT NOT CONTRITE**

Chutzpah! The former police chief of Bell, Calif., Randy Adams, had resigned in disgrace after prosecutors charged eight other city officials with looting the municipal budget. Adams had been recruited by the alleged miscreants (at a sweetheart salary twice what he made as police chief of much larger Glendale), and his resignation left him with a generous state pension of \$240,000 a year. Rather than quietly accept the payout, Adams immediately appealed to a state pension panel, claiming that his one inexplicably rich year in Bell had actually upped his pension to \$510,000 a year. In September, with a straight face, Adams pleaded his case to the panel, but 20 times during the questioning invoked his right not to incriminate himself.

#### THE CONTINUING CRISIS

Doctors Just Want To Have Fun: A 15-year-old Swedish student, working at Malmo University Hospital on a "practical work-life" internship, was allowed by a doctor to make part of the incision for a cesarean section childbirth and to examine the patient vaginally. One alarmed cesarean patient alerted news media after reading about the orientation program in May and wondering if she had been a "hands-on" patient.

IRS agents, investigating tax-fraud suspect Rashia Wilson, 26, turned up "thousands" of identification numbers in a September home search in Tampa, Fla. Wilson had already laid down a challenge in May, when she wrote on Facebook: "I'm Rashia, the queen of IRS tax fraud. (I'm) a millionaire for the record. So if you think that indicting me will be easy, it won't. I promise you. I won't do no time, dumb (expletive unpublished)." The search also turned up a

handgun, and since Wilson is a convicted felon (with 40 arrests), she was jailed and denied bail, in part because of the Facebook post.

Many visitors to San Francisco's historic Castro neighborhood are shocked at the city's culture of street nudism (virtually all by males). Only if the display is "lewd and lascivious" (with the purpose to arouse) is it illegal, but a September report in *SF Weekly* suggests that the nudity must be total – that calling any attention at all to the genitals may suggest lewdness, such as by rings worn around the scrotum.

#### **BRIGHT IDEAS**

Way Too Many Apps: 1) The Swiss company Blacksocks offers an iPhone app that utilizes radio frequency identification chips inserted into socks so they can be automatically sorted. 2) The iPoo app, reported *Wired* magazine in November, "[I]ets you chat with your fellow defecators from the comfort of your own toilet." 3) "In development" now, according to Harvard freshman Olenka Polak, is a "Code Red" app that creates an exchange network so that women and girls who find themselves unexpectedly spotting can locate an emergency source for a tampon or pad.

#### **LATEST RELIGIOUS MESSAGES**

The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that an insane person cannot be executed, no matter how heinous the crime, because he cannot understand why he was being killed.

Notwithstanding that, Florida Judge David Glant has ordered John Ferguson, 64, to death for a 1978 multiple-murder conviction, despite evaluations from 30 doctors that Ferguson is an insane paranoid schizophrenic. (At press time, the U.S. Court of Appeals is

considering Ferguson's lawyers' last-second challenge.) Judge Glant acknowledges that Ferguson is delusional, but found that he nevertheless understands why he is being executed. Ferguson's belief in a Jesus-like resurrection upon death, with a glorious afterlife, is not, Glant said, "so significantly different from beliefs (that) other Christians may hold so as to consider it a sign of insanity."

Spare the Rod: Former Arkansas state Rep. Charlie Fuqua is running again after a 14-year absence from elective office. In the interim, reported the *Arkansas Times* in October, he wrote a book, *God's Law: The Only Political Solution*, reminding Christians that they could put their super-rebellious children to death as long as proper procedure (set out in Deuteronomy 21:18-21) was followed. "Even though this (capital punishment) would rarely be used," Fuqua wrote, "if it were the law of the land ... it would be a tremendous incentive for children to give proper respect to their parents."

Evangelicals' Nightmare Come to Life: A city official in nominally Catholic Tupa, Brazil, granted, for the first time, official "civil union" status to a man and two women, who thus enjoy all the legal benefits of marriage (as per a recent Brazilian Supreme Court decision). A CNN reporter, translating Portuguese documents, said the union was called "polyfidelitous."

#### **FAMILY VALUES**

"Why You Little ...!" 1) A teenager, apparently fed up with his parents' commandeering of their home's basement for an elaborate marijuana-growing operation, turned the couple in in August. The Doylestown Township, Pa., couple (a chiropractor mom and software engineer dad) had sophisticated hardware and 18 plants. 2) Police in Athens, Ga., searching for Homer Parham, 51, at his house in September, came up empty, and his wife said he wasn't there. But as officers were leaving, the couple's young daughter said, "Mommy locked Daddy in the closet." Parham was found hiding in a high-up crawl space.

# Day Trips

#### BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

"The world's richest acre" put Kilgore, Texas, on the map.

In the middle of the Great Depression, most of East Texas hit hard times when King Cotton became a pauper. Then in 1930, the vast East Texas Oil Field was discovered.

Kilgore was near the heart of what was to become the largest oil field in the contiguous United States. So much oil was pumped out of the ground that the price of crude dropped worldwide from \$1.10 to 10-cents a barrel. The wildcatter's response to dropping prices was to pump more oil, as much as 900,000 barrels a day.

The oil boom hit Kilgore like a swarm of locusts. At its height, there were 1,100 wells within the city limits. One downtown block had 44 derricks side by side. Some holes were drilled right through the tile



floors of stores. It was the greatest concentration of oil derricks in the world.

More than 80 years later, oil is still important to the region. Kilgore is known as the "City of Stars" for the electric stars that cap the faux derricks behind the downtown business district. At Christmastime, the light display is a sight to see. Downtown supports several mom-and-pop stores, a great coffee shop, and a couple of good restaurants. It's a distant memory of when the Texas Rangers walked the street to keep peace.

There are only two things that can happen when you play lowa State, and one of them is good. The Texas Longhorns brung it on Saturday, honoring beloved former coach **Darrell Royal** (who passed away Wednesday at age 88) by trouncing the Cyclones 33-7.

It seemed as if every Horn who didn't transfer from Penn State had a great game, especially QB **David Ash**, who completed 25 of 31 for 364 yards and no interceptions. # Silver Linings Playbook

D: David O. Russell: with Bradlev Cooper, Jennifer Lawrence, Robert De Niro, Jacki Weaver, Chris Tucker, Anupam Kher, John Ortiz, Shea Whigham, Julia Stiles. (R, 122 min.)

"Negativity is a poison like nothing else," says bipolar Pat (Cooper), who is newly released from an eight-month stint in a state institution following

a violent episode. Pat is convinced that exercise and a positive outlook - his "silver linings" philosophy – are all it takes to get his estranged wife back: his family and his therapist, however, think some pretty serious meds are in order.

The smartest solution may lie in some balance between the two, and Silver Linings Playbook similarly rides the center line in its empathetic but facile look at mental illness and its light hand with a new romance. When Pat meets Tiffany

(Lawrence), a young widow raw with raging grief, they trade rat-a-tat-like their past experiences with prescription drugs. It's a funny exchange, but a meaningful one, too: They speak the same language. A tentative friendship forms, and Pat's days become newly powered with purpose and direction.

Writer/director David O. Russell, adapting Matthew Quick's novel, is in his element here: The family in crisis and true-to-life cultural/geographical texture have been ongoing considerations of his, from 1996's Flirting With Disaster to 2010 Best Picture nominee The Fighter. Pat's family may not be as flamboyantly dysfunctional, but there's authenticity in the way they fret

and spar and try to smooth Pat's wrinkles with routine. like his mother's Sunday football spread of "crabby snacks and homemades." His father has his Sunday routines, too - the remote controls have to be angled just so, and he's convinced his son is the Philadelphia Eagles' lucky charm - and Russell and De Niro make subtle work of suggesting a mental illness family lineage. In one late scene, they move past suggestion for a harrowing meltdown held back by the presence of a motley array of

> wisecrackers; it made me sorry for what might have been, had Russell's ambition tilted a few clicks away from comic absurdity and toward something more probing.

That isn't to begrudge what Silver Linings Playbook actually is, which is consistently funny and, as it builds to its

conclusion, also very sweet fun. Cooper mostly tamps down that Sexiest Man Alive demeanor that follows him from film to film, and Lawrence - a continually startling young talent – counterpoises her Bardot beauty with a blistering snarl. They both play hurt people clawing their way toward wellness, but it's Lawrence who makes you feel the hurt in your heart – and the hope that it'll get better soon.

#### **JAB TAK HAI JAAN**

#### **A LATE QUARTET**

D: Yaron Zilberman: with Christopher Walken, Philip Seymour Hoffman, Catherine Keener, Mark Ivanir, Imogen Poots, Wallace Shawn, Liraz Charhi. (R, 105 min.)

If you are among those who long to see Christopher Walken play a character other than the wacky eccentric who speaks with a weird cadence, get yourself to the Arbor Cinema to see A Late Quartet. Do it soon, too. There are few other reasons to see this movie, despite its interesting premise and stellar cast. A Late Quartet overplays its bass line and loses sight of the melody, making for a movie that is heavy-handed and sluggish. It remains earthbound when it should soar.

Walken plays Peter Mitchell, the eldest member of a world-renowned string quartet called the Fugue, which has played together for the past 25 years. But when the quartet gathers to rehearse for its upcoming season, his fingers cramp while playing his cello, and the problem is soon diagnosed as the early stages of Parkinson's. His announcement to the group that he intends to quit the Fugue unleashes a rash of internecine conflicts that had heretofore remained beneath the surface. First violinist Daniel Lerner (Mark Ivanir) is an unvielding perfectionist who makes honest discussion impossible. Second violinist Robert Gelbart (Philip Seymour Hoffman) and violist Juliette Gelbart (Catherine Keener) are a married couple. All of them have ties going back to their student days at Juilliard, where Peter was one of their teachers. Egos vie for attention amid the shake-up of the quartet, and a marriage frays under the stress. Add in a further complicating factor created by upand-coming violinist Alexandra Gelbart, who is the daughter of Robert and Juliette and has issues of her own.

While most of the drama simmers at a low boil, it rarely peaks or gets messy. Maybe the film provides an authentic look at New York's music aesthetes, but it isn't terribly engaging to watch. Only Walken creates a character with a rich emotional core that manages to convey

complicated feelings. Everyone else seems too refined to allow personal dramas to shake their equilibrium. Not helping matters is the overly dark camerawork that causes certain sets to look as though the usually outstanding cinematographer Frederick Elmes might have misplaced his light meter. Any artist who has worked as part of a group is sure to find a certain resonance in the offstage tussles of A Late Quartet, but there's too little going on here to sustain other viewers.

#### LINCOLN

Even when filming scenes of chaos or carnage, there's an everything-in-its-place precision to Steven Spielberg's staging. In moments of stillness, you can almost hear the director whispering in an actor's ear to shift a hair to hit a mark, hit the light for a close-up that will tell the viewer exactly how to feel. His is an old-fashioned style of moviemaking that can produce soaring entertainment or, alternately, a fussed-over theatricality. Minute to minute, Lincoln moves between these extremes.

First and certainly foremost: Master shapeshifter Daniel Day-Lewis delivers a monumental portrayal of a man so firmly monumented in our nation's history. The first released trailer inspired an Internet-wide sniggering over the actor's decision to pitch Lincoln's voice high and thin, as if he were already halfway to being a ghost. (Mea culpa: I sniggered, too.) But Day-Lewis inhabits the character bodily - the gray face and pained-stoop likeness is astonishing - and temperamentally, too, as he shifts to present different angles on the storied president, from formidable politician and Great Emancipator to keen wit, devoted father, and unhappy husband. the subject of the latter: *Lincoln*, for all its grand-canvas ambitions, is at its chewiest when dramatizing Lincoln's relationship with his nervous wife Mary, played by Field as a potent brew of bulldog and chipped bonechina teacup. Though in real life, Mary was a decade younger than her husband, Field is a decade older than Day-Lewis; it's a canny casting maneuver on the part of Spielberg that communicates the sense of longtime partners pulling away from one another.

Alas, they are but two in a cast teeming with recognizable faces, all clammering for screentime. I'm not sure what's gained by giving familiars two-minute-long snatches when 90 seconds are wasted just acclimating to, say, Lukas Haas in artfully dirtied Union garb. In adapting historian Doris Kearns Goodwin's Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln, Tony Kushner, the acclaimed playwright (Angels in America) and Spielberg's Munich scripter, stitches together history lesson and TV procedural in this detailing of Lincoln's tooth-and-nail struggle to find votes in the House to pass the 13th Amendment to abolish slavery. Some actors break through the built-in amber of an historical epic - John Hawkes and James Spader enliven the picture as political operatives, while David Straithairn feels authentically of the age as Lincoln's cabinet member, William Seward - while other actors more innately contemporary, like Tommy Lee Jones (no shaking his Texas accent), bully through by dint of personality. But the bygone manner of speaking – formal and florid – doesn't come easily to all the actors, and the result is like the disconnect you see in inferior Shakespeare productions: The mouths are moving, but the eyes don't always connect with the meaning. No worries, Spielberg's gonna spell it out for you anyway.

#### **O** THIS MUST BE THE PLACE

D: Paolo Sorrentino; with Sean Penn, Frances McDormand, Judd Hirsch, Eve Hewson, Kerry Condon, Harry Dean Stanton, Joyce Van Patten, David Byrne, Olven Fouéré, Shea Whigham. (R, 111 min.)

Sean Penn performs another one of his amazing transmogrification acts as the rock star Cheyenne in This Must Be the Place by the Cannes award-winning director Paolo Sorrentino (Il Divo). A goth look-alike for Robert Smith of the Cure, Cheyenne's sky-high, shoulder-length hair drapes his face, and though he's no longer performing, Cheyenne still makes up his face daily with red lipstick and black eyeliner. Cheyenne retired from the spotlight 20 years ago following a tragic event, and he now lives off his royalties and savvy stock investments in a modernized castle in Dublin with his wife Jane (McDormand). He speaks in an odd, high-pitched voice and has a perpetually sad, vacant look in his eyes. Jane, who works as a firefighter, is everything that Cheyenne is not: active and engaged with the world. Their 35-year-long marriage is a study in complementary personalities.

We observe these intriguing characters, and some of their Dublin friends, as they go about their daily lives. About a half-hour into the movie, a phone call informs Cheyenne that his father, whom he hasn't seen in 30 years, is dying. Arriving in the States too late to visit his father on his deathbed, Cheyenne occupies himself with the deceased's notebooks in which his father – a survivor of Auschwitz – obsesses over finding a particular Nazi guard who tormented him in the camp. Inexplicably, Cheyenne embarks

on a road trip across America to hunt down the aged war criminal wherever he might be hiding. Various stops along the way seem, at first, inscrutable, yet are really quite focused. Cheyenne's road trip to Michigan, New Mexico, and Utah has the feel of a Wim Wenders journey, thus it's altogether appropriate that Wenders' *Paris, Texas* star, Harry Dean Stanton, makes a poetically resonant appearance here as the man who patented the idea of attaching wheels to luggage.

Mixing faded rock glory with Nazi-hunting and American road-tripping creates an odd hybrid that is completely transfixing, although some viewers are likely to find this film an awkward mishmash. The drama, however, is consistently offset by comic underpinnings, which are well-played by the actors and seamlessly presented by Sorrentino, with the aid of striking compositions and fluid cinematography by Luca Bigazzi. David Byrne - whose Talking Heads tune provides the movie's elliptically apt title - co-wrote original music for This Must Be the Place with Will Oldham, and also appears in the film playing himself. Like a good novel that you don't want to end, this odd movie made me sad to part from its company. To quote the lyrics to "This Must Be the Place (Naive Melody)": "Home is where I want to be/But I guess I'm already there."

As the CIA contemplates extraction, Mendez hatches a crazy plan: creating the cover of a location-scouting expedition for a science fiction movie called Argo. As we follow every step of the mission, Affleck's deft craftsmanship and casting instincts are on full display. Not allowing well enough to be, however, is the multiple-pronged coda, which slackens Argo's taut pace to a crawl. The clever conceit of this time-travel thriller, however. is that when former assassin Joe (Willis) assesses his wayward youth, he is staring young Joe (Gordon-Levitt) in the face - and young Joe wants him dead. Orphaned early and taken in by the mob, young Joe turns a tidy profit dispatching victims zapped back in time by unseen bosses 30 years in the future. Then, some bald jerk with a familiar jawline arrives, and Joe realizes he's meant to assassinate his future self. The chase is on. With Looper, writer/director Rian Johnson incorporates the kicky mental gymnastics of time-travel, the relentless heart rate of a crackerjack thriller, and the extreme violence of a modern actioner. If you're looking for guts-splaying, Looper certainly satisfies - but it's the emotional guts of the thing that'll hound you long after. (09/28/2012)

# THE PERKS OF BEING A WALLFLOWER

Truly, every shy, thoughtful kid deserves the kind of support system that rallies around Charlie when his depression overwhelms him. Based on the experiences of journalist and poet Mark O'Brien, a polio survivor who recounted the loss of his virginity in an article titled "On Seeing a Sex Surrogate," *The Sessions* is an unsentimental movie about the need for intimacy and human contact. Upon receiving a magazine assignment to pen an article about sex and the disabled person, O'Brien (John

Hawkes) faces the fact that he has had no sexual experiences of his own. Enter Helen Hunt, who plays sex surrogate Cheryl Cohen Greene. Her pragmatic attitude and matter-of-fact approach to sex meshes nicely with O'Brien's acerbic wit, and over the course of their sessions, an emotional bond grows. Writer/director Ben Lewin, himself a polio survivor, brings sensitivity to the project by never plunging into sentimental fluff or pitying mannerisms. There are few surprises in *The Sessions*; the normalcy of individuals "just looking for some touch" is what's celebrated here. (11/09/2012)

In the attic, Ellison finds a mysterious box of Super-8 film reels which record the handiwork of "Mr. Boogie": garish family mutilations. But even when Ellison's son (D'Addario) and daughter (Foley) start drawing graphic pictures of these crimes, Ellison stands his ground on this house's creaky floorboards. That's not all that's creaky, either. 





Tom Hamilton: I wouldn't know about the metal people, although the vibe I get is, yes, very right-wing, a lot of people. But as far as my kind of band, I'm not even sure

And I remember thinking, "Why on earth would they want to use a song about having sex with teenage girls?" [Laughs] So, that didn't really stay on track. Hopefully some brainiac in the organization realized what the song was about.

AC: Funny that the Thin Lizzy estate didn't want Mitt Romney's campaign using "The Boys Are Back in Town."

TH: Oh, I commend his taste, I have to say.
