

## TRYING TIMES FOR SOUTH AUSTIN COMMUNITY

Dear Editor,

Re: "Southern Exposure" [News, Dec. 28]: I have been a devoted resident of South Lamar for nearly a decade. Through the vast and rapidly changing projects that have occurred over the years, I have seen the city development as a kind of microcosm of what the entire Central Texas region is undergoing. For every small victory locals have enjoyed here, we've had twice as many losses.

But to be honest, despite the traffic, despite the increase in property prices, despite all of the desolate incompleteness, I have found the growth to be less than offensive. South Lamar has still maintained an influx of local businesses and maintained a few of the beloved ones. And while we've lost a few that cannot be replaced, like Ray Hennig's Heart of Texas Music, the culture of South Lamar doesn't seem to be in too much jeopardy.

That is, until very recently, when I received a real estate report from Spyglass Realty filled with info that seemed almost ironic. In the



piece entitled "The Future of South Lamar," they wrote, "And with any major change comes questions. Will South Lamar lose its charm? What will the traffic be like? What is happening to our neighborhood? One concern is that the retail spaces attract tenants like Barley Swine, rather than McDonald's. Like it or not, change is coming."

As a part-owner of a small local business myself, it seems to me that this agency is really out of touch with the character of the area. Am I the only South Lamar resident who gets to Barton Springs Road and wonders, "Why the hell do we still even have a McDonald's here?" I know I'm not. So why does Spyglass Realty express this sentiment as if people like myself are the ones saying it? It's fairly insulting and a depressing reminder of not only the shift in scenery, but a gouging of the spirit that used to dwell here.

These are trying times for people of South Lamar, who have always seen themselves reflected culturally in the environment surrounding them. This packet is just a tiny nail deeper into the Heart of Texas.

# Backstage at the Circus

#### The Lege melodrama can be a hard act to swallow

After a couple of decades of following the Texas Legislature, I admit I find it increasingly difficult to embrace the return of the biennial circus. Oh, they're entertaining enough, I suppose. This week's opening episode featured the farcical denouement of Longview Republican Rep. David Simpson's challenge to the House speakership of bilities" of government. He even dared a sly incumbent Joe Straus. Simpson

(aka the Scourge of the Transportation Safety Administration), with the always rhetorical help of hard-right backbenchers and bloggers, had puffed himself up like one of those harmless lizards inflating his jowls to frighten predators. In the end, he withdrew without a humiliating vote, muttering gracelessly about alleged and unspecified "retaliation." Straus was reelected by acclamation.

In that context, it was refreshing to hear the speaker accept the job with a real sense of public responsibility rather than political sabre-rattling. Straus noted that the Legislature's job is to represent all Texans, including the 10 million or so newcomers

expected to arrive over the next two decades. With that in mind, the session's priorities, he declared, should be "quality education, a reliable water supply, a healthy transportation system, and an honest state budget." Straus is no liberal, but it's hard to argue with his call to sustain the "core responsi-

> dig at the reckless secession talk disfiguring Texas political discourse in recent years: "Our

economy is so vast and diverse that if Texas were its own country - and no, don't worry, that isn't something we're going to do this session - but if we were, we'd be the 14th largest economy in the world."

He reiterated the need to focus on education - likely to be a budget flashpoint after the radical cuts last session - suggesting at least some willingness to address the structural shortfall for both public schools and higher ed.. Alas, it's unlikely that he'll have many or sufficient GOP allies.

Intriguingly, Straus' emphasis on education was echoed in the Senate, where San Antonio Democrat Leticia Van de Putte accepted her election as president pro tem. She noted the same state demographic trends, adding that most of the growth welcomed in the abstract by conservative pols - is in the Latino population and requires a renewed commitment to education, lest Texas waste a "historic opportunity to build something grand." Ever hopeful, Van de Putte reiterated her welcoming catchphrase: "Bienvenidos, y'all.'

#### **Hard Shell Game**

It would be delusional, of course, to describe that optimism as the week's dominant Capitol note. The Senate's president pro perm - Lt. Governor David Dewhurst fresh from a hard-right trouncing in his U.S. Senate campaign, has vowed to make Texas "the most fiscally and socially conservative" state in the union, by which he primarily means "repeated tax cuts" and whatever else the Tea Party wants. Governor-for-Life Rick Perry beat the same drum, even

#### Headlines

- As the new year gets rolling, the first regular City Council meeting is next Thursday (Jan. 17, work session Tuesday), with a brace of Austin **Energy** solar rebates for nonprofits ("Then There's This," p.10), and some zoning cases from 2012 ("Council Preview: A Bar on Burnet?!?," p.12).
- > Austin ISD trustees have revived their controversial plans to create three single-sex schools. These had seemed dead in December, with few tears shed in the community, but they returned at the Jan. 7 work session: a magnet boys' academy, funded in part by the Moody Foundation, mirroring the Ann Richards School for Young Women Leaders; plus turning Pearce and Garcia middle schools into twinned single-sex institution. In discussion, the board glossed over the lack of evidence for benefits of gender-based segregation.
- On Jan. 8, the Lower Colorado River Authority board of directors voted to request drought relief withholding water from downstream farming if severe drought conditions affecting the Highland Lakes do not significantly improve by March 1. The request requires confirmation from the **Texas Commission on Environmental Quality**
- Travis County Commissioners discussed but didn't vote on a potential ban on gun shows at county facilities (Saxet Gun Shows are held regularly at the Travis County Exposition Center). After consulting privately with county attorneys, Judge Sam Biscoe cast doubt on the legality of such a ban.
- The 83rd session of the Texas Legislature began on Jan. 8 with splits among the Republican leadership: Gov. Rick Perry talked about tax cuts and fetal pain, Speaker Joe Straus concentrated on education and transportation, while Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst has put water at the top of his agenda. 

as the manufactured holes in this year's yet unwritten budget will have to be filled by rising revenues already spent in the last one. But the governor again called for "tax relief" – rather than responding to the state's critical needs in education and health care, he's content to applaud growth while refusing to pay for it.

For Perry, in good times and bad, tax cuts are always the priority - that, and finding hot-button issues to distract the voters from the shell games being played with their money. With redistricting, voter ID, and public school finance currently punted to the courts, Perry's nominated distractions for this session appear to be drug-testing of working people (i.e., public assistance and unemployment insurance applicants) and the ever-reliable anti-abortion crusade.

It's that sort of pandering that makes it difficult, bi-year after bi-year, to extend a full-throated Austin welcome once again to the state's dominant political players. While there are quite a few pols in the Straus and Van de Putte mode, they are unhappily outnumbered by folks ready to follow the Perry and Dewhurst model: permanent cynics, permanent campaigners, permanent panderers.

#### The Limits of Citizenship

So bienvenidos it is, but with very mixed emotions. The spectacle of grown men (and some women) putting on all that pomp and circumstance in order to (in recent example) prescribe invasive gynecological procedures for pregnant Texas women while they simultaneously make it impossible for many thousands more of those same women even to visit a gynecologist - that process has an undeniable entertainment value, even an educational aspect, in the fine art of institutional hypocrisy. It's painful to watch - mortifying even – but instructive nonetheless. On the other hand, there are thousands of real lives at stake - Texas families, Texas children, Texas working people - making it difficult simply to laugh and turn away.

Not surprisingly, Perry's opening-day speech to the Lege bypassed Texas women altogether, to embrace instead the unformed contents of their wombs: "We also need to better protect our most vulnerable citizens, the unborn, by expanding the ban on abortion to any baby that can feel the pain of the procedure." That official "protection," of course, will not extend to "citizenbabies" actually born – since the governor has repeatedly made it clear he will oppose any expansion of Medicaid that in fact pays for most of these Texas births, and will also do everything in his power to undermine national health care in Texas.

In Perry's political universe, citizen vulnerability has an expiration date. "Fetal pain," he proclaims, is to be outlawed. Once that citizen takes her first breath, however, she's on her own. When the governor says, "Suffer the little children" - he really means it.

## **Solar for Lease**

#### IT JUST GOT EASIER FOR NONPROFITS TO GO GREEN

With very little fanfare, the City Council last month approved the first solar-lease project – an innovative financial model that allows nonprofits, schools, and other cash-strapped entities to reap the benefits of solar without busting the bank to pay for it. The Council's decision could have a far-reaching impact on the city's energy future - possibly adding tens of thousands more power-generating solar panels to rooftops across 437 square miles of Austin **Energy**'s service area.

LifeWorks, a

resource organization for young people and families, is the first nonprofit to become eligible for performance-based incentives through a new solar-lease

arrangement with Meridian Solar, an Austin-based installation company. Now other nonprofits, churches, schools, and government agencies - entities that are neither flush with cash nor eligible for federal solar tax credits - are exploring similar solar-lease agreements with AE-approved vendors. Some have advanced as far as the Council's Jan. 17 agenda, which includes proposals that would provide performance-based incentives to affordable housing communities owned by

Foundation Communities and the city Housing Authority, as well as two Goodwill **Industries** facilities.

PBIs used to be cold, hard cash rebates, but after Austin Energy exhausted its solar rebate budget for commercial and nonprofit organizations a few years ago, the utility hit the pause button in 2010 and crafted the PBI plan, paying 14 cents for every kilowatt-hour of energy churned out by a solar system for up to 10 years. That's when solar became cost-prohibitive for nonprofits, which had previously relied on up-front rebates to help finance their systems. So the utility spent the

next two years trying to the figure out how to get nonprofits back on board. Under the new financial model, LifeWorks is installing

a fairly extensive photovoltaic power generation system at its

**Sooch Foundation Youth & Family** Resource Center, which opened last year at 835 N. Pleasant Valley, near Austin Community College's Eastview Campus. Lifeworks' Chief Operating Officer Mitch Weynand said they started reviewing solar options during construction of the East Austin facility, in trying to make it a five-star green building. Meridian had put forward a proposal to install a 276,000-kilowatt array on top of the three-story building and a covered parking structure. The nonprofit wanted to go big on solar, except there was one major obstacle: a lack of funding.

"LifeWorks didn't have the money to just buy the equipment, so that's when the seeds of a leasing arrangement were planted," Weynand said. It turned out that AE had been looking at the same type of financial model. Now, with the blessings of the utility and the city, LifeWorks will lease the equipment for a 10-year period, with the goal of purchasing it with financing gained through energy savings and funding from the PBIs, which is estimated to cover more than half the \$660,000 project.

Tim Harvey, conservation programs specialist for the utility, sees the new arrangement as a win-win for both nonprofits and AE's entire electric delivery system, particularly during peak demand periods of long summer afternoons. "The nonprofit benefits because the meter rolls back - it's called net metering - when the solar's producing. They're able to use the power, and it reduces the need for them to use the power from the electric grid," he said.

#### **MAKING IT WORK**

For years, Foundation Communities was a leader on the green energy front, but its pioneering solar endeavors were among those that halted when AE implemented the PBI plan. "That essentially broke the deal for us as a nonprofit," said Sunshine Mathan, the nonprofit's design and development director. Mathan, an active player in the solar community, worked with Karl Rábago, AE's former head of conservation efforts, to fashion a plan that would benefit nonprofits without hitting the utility's pocketbook. "It didn't really land anywhere, unfortunately."

Once the solar lease idea emerged, Mathan again set about trying to make the plan work for Foundation Communities. But while the lease agreement proposals are set for Council approval next week, Mathan says the nonprofit is still parsing the details and considering vendors. "We're not sure [the proposed agenda items] are going to go through," he said. "It's up to us to determine whether the financials work."

As for LifeWorks, Weynand says he's pleased his organization made the jump. He pointed to Meridian's precise breakdown of how Austin will benefit from the new system, once it's up and running. According to Meridian's calculations, the system will save about 253,417 kWh a year - about what it takes to power 22 average Austin homes. Taking that a step further, the savings are equivalent to planting nearly 4,000 trees or eliminating 29 cars from Austin streets. As for air emissions, Meridian estimates LifeWorks' system will save 168 tons of carbon dioxide, 211 pounds of sulfur dioxide, 234 pounds of nitrogen oxide, and 163 pounds of carbon monoxide.

Put in those terms, it's easy to visualize solar and other renewable energy sources someday rendering power plants obsolete. Even in Texas.




# **Lege Opening Day: Users and Abusers**

What happens when someone schedules a partisan fight - and no one throws a punch? You get opening day, Tuesday, Jan. 8, at the Texas Legislature. They came, they convened, they pontificated, and the lawmakers now move forward in a fog, with little clear direction or schedule.

As the 83rd session gaveled in at midday, legislators already had some good news. A day earlier, Comptroller Susan Combs submitted a larger-than-expected budget revenue estimate for the 2014-15 biennium. She forecast that \$96.2 billion will be collected over the next two years, as well as an \$8.8 billion surplus from this cycle. Much of that "surplus" (generously defined) will go straight into a supplemental appropriations bill to cover outstanding commitments to Medicaid and the Foundation School Program, but it provides some breathing room. With that in mind, it seemed no one was willing to break the good mood; affable bipartisanship was the order of the day.

In the House, the minor exception was Longview Republican David Simpson's attempt to overthrow Speaker Joe Straus, which sputtered out with a rambling withdrawal speech from the challenger. Muttering against a culture of "intimidation [and] payback," Simpson called for rule changes that would mean "ceasing retribution ... from



those in leadership." He made no specific allegations, leading some veterans to privately wonder how he would have functioned under the dictatorial regime of Straus' predecessor, Tom Craddick. With Simpson quickly out of the way, the nomination speeches were devoted to glowing praise of Straus. Ignoring the harsh partisan battles over redistricting and reproductive rights that roiled the 82nd session, Democrats and Republicans celebrated his evenhanded management style. In a pointed rebuttal to Simpson, Rep. Rene Oliviera, D-Brownsville, said, "I support Joe Straus, not because I agree with him on many things, but because I can disagree with him without fear of reprisal or ridicule."

Over in the Senate, there was a similar spirit of bonhomie as Sen. Leticia Van de Putte. D-San Antonio, was selected as president pro tem. That means that, on the rare occasions when both Gov. Rick Perry and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst are out of the state, a Democrat will become acting governor. Her appointment was a matter of practice and tradition rather than a real battle. Senators punted on the only real sticking point, quietly rejecting plans to dump the two-thirds rule, a "blocker bill" tradition that in most sessions keeps controversial proposals off the floor.

Then came the policy grandstanding. With fellow failed presidential candidate Rick Santorum an unexpected onlooker, Gov. Perry laid out his agenda, including a fetal pain bill, and more drum-beating for reduced business taxation. His ideological checklist stood in sharp contrast to Straus', which nominated water, transportation, and education as his priority items.

However, much may be on hold, as lawmakers find themselves surrounded by volatility. After an almost unprecedented round of retirements, primary defeats, and



promotions to state Senate and U.S. Congress, the House is incorporating 43 freshmen this year. Their learning curve will be steep, especially since they're still awaiting separate court rulings on challenges to the state's public school finance system, redistricting, and the voter ID legislation. They may have a healthier than predicted budget, but they're already facing calls from inside and outside the Lege to restore the \$5 billion in school finance cuts passed in 2011. It's no easier on the Senate side: Normally, after redistricting, the Senate's first job is to select which senators will serve a full four-year term and which will have to run again in 2014. Instead, they've had to defer that until further legal consultation. Straus argued that the only thing he could be certain of was that there would be 150 votes on the House floor to revise the school "accountability" system (i.e., highstakes standardized testing) - but even he couldn't say what might replace it.

The next question is, who will run the session? Straus promoted a pragmatic agenda, but it could fall apart in the details; Perry still has the governor's bully pulpit, yet he is coming off a catastrophic presidential run and may face increasingly tough questions about how to fix (or abandon) many of his favored programs, including the Texas Emerging Technology Fund and the beleaguered Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas.

Dewhurst probably has the weakest hand: A Senate primary drubbing, courtesy of Tea Party darling Ted Cruz, and a roster of challengers lining up for the 2014 elections leave him in a weakened position. However, he's been even more aggressive in his calls for state investment, specifically for \$1 billion from the Rainy Day Fund to create a water infrastructure bank. That would place him at odds with Perry, who effectively ruled out accessing the Rainy Day Fund, and then went further, arguing that the budget revenue estimate was a case for greater tax cuts. Straus struck a subtler tone: He sided with Perry against "raiding" the state's surplus, but pointed out there's a big difference between using and raiding.

#### **Council Preview: A Bar on Burnet?!?** Laura Morrison (I) and Kathie Tovo were the two dissenting votes against a proposal for a new Little Woodrow's on Burnet Road.

City Hall is not guite up to 2013 speed just yet, but the next regular City Council meeting is Thursday, Jan. 17 (work session Jan. 15). Much of the preliminary agenda (finalized Jan. 11) is taken up with zoning matters – quite a few carried over from last year - notably the complex East Riverside Corridor Regulating Plan, hotly debated in November but now anticipated for adoption; as they say in all caps, THE PUBLIC HEARING IS CLOSED.

More likely to raise sand will be the hearing over the proposed Austin Hotel (Eighth and Congress), with dueling recommendations for a CBD-H-CURE zoning change, endorsed by city staff but rejected by the Planning Commission, and opposed as well by the Downtown Austin Alliance. (We'll have more on that case next week.)

Zoning, of course, is where citywide macropolicy collides with neighborhood micropolitics - with sparks often flying. In that vein, also returning, in theory for second and third readings, will be the Little Woodrow's bar and restaurant proposed for 5425 Burnet Rd., in a retro-Fifties building that is the former site of Nelson Puett Real Estate. (The sign's still there, but the business has long since moved up to Anderson

Lane.) The case - whether to grant "CS-1" zoning, thus enabling a bar - occasioned two hours of heated discussion at last year's final meeting, Dec. 13. Both staff and the Planning Commission recommended approval (the latter by a daunting 9-0), although with the understanding that various operating matters (parking requirements, street design, etc.) would return for conditional use permits.

Council wasn't so sure - on first reading, the zoning passed only 4-2, Laura Morrison and Kathie Tovo dissenting - concurring with nearby neighborhood associations (Brentwood, Allandale) that objected primarily that the venue will be a late-night bar thinly disguised as a restaurant. Leaseholder Rick Engel (in addition to four Little Woodrow's, Engel owns Austin Java, Uncle Billy's, and Ski Shores) insisted that he's a good neighbor and that this venue would be an unobjectionable restaurant-cum-public-house in keeping with the Burnet commercial corridor. The neighbors say it walks, talks, and quacks like a bar, and would bring traffic, noise, congestion, and crime to nearby residential streets.

The NAs hadn't quite accumulated enough signatures to constitute a valid opposing petition in December - whether



the intervening weeks have altered that math remains to be seen. Other than Tovo and Morrison, Council members mostly wondered about sufficient off-street parking. That's a question partly to be determined in the CU permit process, and as Bill Spelman summed up resignedly, "I can tell we're going to see it again anyway."

He was speaking of the coming CU process - which almost certainly recircles via the Planning Commission to Council, on appeal by either side – but he might have been talking about Jan. 17: the return of Little Woodrow's. - Michael King

#### Garza Cleared for Minority Business

A black contractors' group has lost its challenge to the city's minority certification process that benefited a former assistant city manager who once oversaw the program.

The city's rejection last month of a complaint filed by the Austin Black Contractors Association allows former ACM Rudy Garza to keep his certified status as a minority business owner. Garza retired from his work with the city in June, formed an engineering firm with prominent business owner Paul Bury in July, and received minority business certification from the city in September.

Deputy City Manager Michael McDonald reviewed the complaint and notified the contractors' group and Garza of his findings in a Dec. 13 letter. He wrote that he had denied the challenge based on documents and other information put forward during a Dec. 7 informal hearing over which he presided. But he offered no other explanation, except to list the names of those who attended the informal gathering: Garza attorney (and son of former

Texas House Speaker) Pete Laney; Deputy City Attorney Anne Morgan, and Assistant City Attorney Cindy Crosby. McDonald followed up with a Dec. 14 letter stating, "No further appeals or action will be accepted or taken on this matter."

A phone message left with a representative of the contractors association had not been returned at press time.

Until December 2011, Garza supervised the city's **Small and Minority Business Resources Department**, which manages the certification of minority- and women-owned businesses. The city department was established in the late Eighties to ensure that historically disadvantaged businesses would be able to obtain a fair share of the city's contract work. The contractors' group questioned whether Garza should be considered "disadvantaged" given his inside knowledge of City Hall, as well as his salary at the time he left the city - \$194,293, according to the public employee salary list posted on the Texas Tribune website. - Amy Smith



# Under the Bus: Next Stop at the ATU

When we last talked at length to Amalgamated Transit Union 1091 President Jay Wyatt, in mid-November, he said a drivers' and mechanics' strike was days away. "It definitely seems we're going to be heading towards a strike," Wyatt told the Chronicle on Nov. 12. "We have no choice. It will happen sometime this week." Wyatt said that negotiations between ATU 1091 and Capital Metro's latest subcontractor, Dallas-based McDonald Transit, were going badly, and he accused Cap Metro of driving the stalemate behind the scenes, effectively "pushing for a strike." Both Cap Metro and McDonald denied Wyatt's charges, and John Bartosiewicz, McDonald's managing director, insisted that negotiations with the union were slowly but steadily making progress.

Nearly two months later ... no, you didn't miss the strike. In retrospect, skeptics might well conclude the strike that never happened had a good deal to do with the inaugural Formula One race scheduled for that Nov. 16-18 weekend. The F1 events came and went without a strike, the transit response was quite successful (much to the credit of Cap Metro and its employees), and though neither side is talking at the moment, negotiations have been proceeding this month. Whether Wyatt's woofing just before the big event helped him at the contract table is unknown, but he has persistently charged that the subcontractor, in unspoken league with the agency, is bargaining in "bad faith" in order to force an impasse and thereby impose its own terms: most prominently, a "two-tier" wage system that would bring in new employees at a lower rate, damaging worker job security and undermining the union.

More recently, Wyatt told the *Chronicle* that current employees, once employed by former agency subcontractor **StarTran**, are now effectively in employment limbo because they are described as "terminated" by StarTran but are not yet under contract with McDonald – meaning that their credit histories, financial statuses, and even their potential applications for other jobs have been placed in jeopardy.

Presumably, these matters will be addressed in ongoing negotiations. On another front, not so readily addressed, is a lawsuit - against ATU, Wyatt, and seven other ATU employees and board members - filed last summer by former ATU administrative secretary Alice Harrison, who worked for the union from late 2007 until she was terminated in July 2010. Harrison's federal lawsuit, currently pending in the court of U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks, charges sexual and racial discrimination on the part of Wyatt and other ATU staff. Specifically, Harrison alleges that Wyatt and several other staffers made unwanted verbal and physical sexual advances to her, that other staffers used inflammatory racial language in her presence - including persistent use of the word "nigger" and intimidating references to the Ku Klux Klan - and that the union retaliated against her when she said she was willing to offer testimony against Wyatt in a 2010 sexual harassment investigation initiated by Cap Metro administrators. She's asking for back pay and punitive damages.

Harrison filed her suit last July, and thus far the union's legal responses have been

primarily procedural – broadly, that her suit attempts to cobble a racial discrimination claim out of what is in fact a sexual harassment claim, such that it is either misapplying the relevant law or else falls outside the statute of limitations. Amid the procedural back and forth (Harrison is represented by San Antonio lawyers), ATU's longtime attorney, **Glenda** 

**Pittman**, withdrew because Harrison says she may want to call her as a witness. The union is now being represented by **Ted Smith** of Cornell, Smith, and Mierl – Smith told the *Chronicle* his firm (which more often represents employers) has a policy of not commenting on pending litigation.

That leaves to speculation any substantive or specific union response to Harrison's charges. It's not beyond belief that somebody at ATU might engage in sexual harassment – that was the charge made against Wyatt by Cap Metro administrative employees in 2010, when they accused him of unacceptably coarse language in meetings. But



the breadth and extent of Harrison's claims, and the number of staff members she accuses of everything from direct physical advances to repeated racial epithets – among mostly minority staff members – somewhat strains credulity. In any case, for the next few weeks, the lawsuit has moved to "alternative dispute resolution," and if it can't be resolved via some sort of settlement, it won't make Sparks' docket until April 25, 2014. By that time, we should at least know whether ATU 1091 has gone on strike – or has found a way to resolve its contract differences with McDonald Transit.

#### Fruitcake of the Year for 2012







To explore Waller Creek and environs is to live intensively in the modern world and at the same time to be aware of how brief an instant modernity has been with us; how brief an instant, indeed, the human presence has been here in any guise to contemplate a very old set of surroundings.

- Joseph Jones, Life on Waller Creek

In 1982, Joseph Jones published Life on Waller Creek, a meditative book about the University of Texas English professor's decades-long love affair with one of Austin's main urban creeks. For years Jones strolled the creek, taking "inventories" in which he described his thoughts and feelings while picking up trash (some of which he made into art objects) and observing the landscape - a practice that led to his appearance in Richard Linklater's 1991 film, Slacker. In the film, Jones, who had been one of Linklater's professors, talks about the tragedy of life while meandering down a street that crosses Waller Creek. Twenty years later, much of Austin is hardly recognizable - but the area around Waller Creek remains largely unchanged. Jones died in 1999, after 40 years at UT, teaching Commonwealth English literature. He was heavily influenced by American Transcendentalists Ralph Waldo Emerson and Henry David Thoreau, who believed human beings thrived as selfreliant individuals and should be skeptical of society and its institutions.

Life on Waller Creek is also a history of the creek, named after Edwin Waller, chosen in 1839 by Texas President Mirabeau Lamar to survey the new Capitol site and begin erecting public buildings. (In 1840, Waller was elected Austin's first mayor.) Shortly after the founding of the Republic of Texas, Lamar had sent a party of four men from Houston to locate a site for the new capital. On April 13, 1839, they reported to the president about the future site of Austin, then called "Waterloo" – a hamlet containing only two families: "The imagina-

tion of even the romantic will not be disappointed on viewing the valley of the Colorado, and the fertile and gracefully undulating woodlands and luxuriant prairies at a distance from it. The most skeptical will not doubt its healthiness, and the citizen's bosom must swell with honest pride when, standing in the portico of the capital of this country, he looks abroad upon a region worthy only of being the home of the brave and the free."

Waller Creek, in the heart of this majestic valley, is about 7 miles long, and merges from two branches along the northern border of the UT campus. The creek's watershed, just over a mile wide at its maximum, now lies mostly between Lamar Boulevard to the west and I-35 to the east. More than 50 bridges span the creek – warped wood footbridges, hefty limestone edifices, sixlane highways.

#### **Walking the Creek**

At the intersection of Seventh and Sabine streets, steep limestone embankments frame the creek and push up and into the surrounding city. During a late summer visit, the sounds of chirping birds and buzzing insects commingle with blaring radios, sound checks, and passing conversations. Pieces of white bread float in the shallow, moss-hued water, alongside plastic bags, beer cans, and darting mosquito fish. Within sight in either direction recline members of Austin's large homeless community.

Minutes before, I'd made the passage from Austin's Eastside to Downtown, crossing under the traffic-laden I-35 and entering the Red River district, home to music clubs – Stubb's, Beerland, Mohawk, etc. In the midday heat, stagehands carted amps from trailer to venue. I descended a flight of


stairs and passed through the looking glass into an entirely different ecosystem: the partly subterranean, partly submerged life of Waller Creek.

Hanging vines sloped over water-stained limestone walls, and trash eddied around large stepping stones protruding from the creek's shallow water; graffiti lined the corridors passing under streets in either direction. Heading south along the stone walkway toward Lady Bird Lake, I emerged at Easy Tiger, a bar with Ping-Pong tables abutting the creek; balls floated along the far side of the creek, about a 15-foot drop down a reinforced concrete wall.

At Fourth Street, a wooden fence lined a construction site, where the extensive tunnel project that will dramatically alter Waller Creek was under way. The tunnel, scheduled to open in 2014, will relieve the creek of its biggest threat (to development) or defense (from development) – its 100-year floodplain. The flood control will allow redevelopment of about 28 acres, or 1.2 million square feet, of Downtown.

Once the project is completed, inlets along the creek will catch stormwater and send it 70 feet underground, through limestone, into a subway-size tunnel. During a storm, water from approximately 85% of the creek's 5.75-square-mile watershed will be diverted into the tunnel, which leads to Lady Bird Lake. In dry periods, lake water recirculated up to Waterloo Park via a pumping system will maintain the otherwise stagnating creek waters, and the appearance and vitality of the creek.

Just south of Third Street is Palm Park, an uninviting patch of grass and pavement between Waller Creek and I-35. An overgrown, abandoned public pool lies dormant within a chain-link fence. Two padded benches, their purple and blue vinyl shim-



mering in the heat, stand on either side of a lifeguard chair, just above the uncut vegetation. Ivy spilled over the fence long ago, obscuring something spelled out in bright blue fabric patches.

Slowly the words surfaced: Go With The Flow

A sinewy man on a bike with no tires wheels, but no tires - suddenly approached. "I've been watching you for a while. I live down here, so I have to know what's going on," he said. His jeans, far too large around the waist, were held up by string, and his soiled T-shirt, featuring a large illustration of Chuck Norris, read "Don't F&%K With Chuck."

The man said he went by "Crisco," and asked me to hold his pocket Bible while he gathered baseball-sized rocks, for hunting what he said were water moccasins. (I later proximity to Austin's Resource Center for the Homeless and other medical care, job counseling, and legal aid services. "There are a number of organizations at each end of Waller Creek that cause those experiencing homelessness to traverse that pathway," said Richard Troxell, president of House the Homeless, an educational and advocacy group for homeless Austinites.

Troxell estimates that about 1,000 homeless individuals use the creek corridor daily. Lately, he says, the city has been encouraging the police to keep the homeless out of the area, he believes to prepare for coming development. He imagines the future Waller Creek as much like the heavily commercialized San Antonio River Walk - homelessfree. "I think the development is a mixed bag," said Troxell. "It will sweep Austin's homeless out of the Downtown area, but if homeless service providers are smart, they'll be able to parlay the onset of the change to favorably affect the people experiencing homelessness in Austin."

Troxell thinks nonprofits aiding the homeless need to work together and plan ahead to build resources and move their organizations elsewhere; otherwise, the business community will buy them out one at a time. "If they do get bought out, the homeless community will be run over by this wave of new energy that's coming," he said. "A wave that will be very moneyed and very police-secure."

The starkest contrast between the worlds above and below is at the 15th Street bridge, just north of Waterloo Park, currently a staging ground for the main Waller Creek tunnel inlet and pump station. The tall, barbed-wire-strung planks delineating the construction site's border present a jarring juxtaposition with the neighboring Centennial Park, which that day harbored a dozen or so transients. Under the bridge, a semipermanent homeless camp announced itself with a reappropriated "Sidewalk Closed" sign placed in the middle of the walkway. The Capitol building in the background added another layer to the composition.

learned that no poisonous snakes inhabit Waller Creek.) He charged a metal railing that separated the park from the creek, throwing rocks as the railing broke his momentum. "These snakes are really nasty; I've got to keep them scared because otherwise they come up where I live," said Crisco, as he hurled rocks at a brownish-red four-foot snake. His camp, a dozen yards downriver in the middle of the creek bank, was little more than some clothing and trash bags.

Satisfied after frightening the snake into a half-submerged mess of trash and branches, Crisco retired under a knobby old oak to wait out an afternoon shower. He said he'd been living along Waller Creek for three years and was slowly being pushed south toward Lady Bird Lake by the police.

While the Waller Creek project is itself a giant civic undertaking, it also reflects the classic urban battle between "quality of life" and poor people, including the homeless. Austin has a homeless population of several thousand, many of whom spend time near Waller Creek, due in part to its

#### The Latest Vision

"Waller Creek is the creek most likely to succeed at the hands of architects and city planners," wrote Joseph Jones. "In March 1980, the Austin City Council approved a contract of nearly two million dollars to improve the creek (with a hike and bike trail, landscaping, walls, tunnels, and the like) through downtown."

Thirty years later, Jones' prediction awaits completion, the only certainty being that \$2 million isn't even close to enough money. Now that the tunnel is under way, momentum is growing, most recently with the selection of Michael Van Valkenburgh Associates and Thomas Phifer & Partners from New York City to redesign the Waller Creek landscape. In October, people packed City Hall to hear the Waller Creek Conservancy announce the winners of its highly publicized design competition.

MVVA is best known for leading the recent Brooklyn Bridge Park redesign efforts - an 85-acre sustainable waterfront park that runs 1.3 miles along Brooklyn's East River shoreline. I visited the park this summer and was impressed by the diversity of the project, which includes playgrounds, waterfront promenades, trails, and a restored carousel housed in a distinctive Jean Nouvel pavilion - all tied together through subtle design elements. There are stunning views of the lower Manhattan skyline, including the new One World Trade Center and the Brooklyn Bridge. It's an indicator of what might be accomplished with Waller Creek.

MVVA's winning proposal, which will transform 1.5 miles of the creek, is designed along a romantically named chain of parks: the Lattice, the Grove, the Refuge, and the Confluence. In November, Austin voters authorized \$13 million in bond funding, with another \$17 million promised in the next few years and an ultimate price tag of \$60 million. The Waller Creek Conservancy, a nonprofit formed to support the project, believes it can raise another \$60 million in private donations, for something as dramatic as New York City's High Line, a long, elevated park built on a former section of Manhattan railroad.

"I think there is a good parallel between the projects," said Frederick Steiner, dean of the UT School of Architecture. "One is elevated and the other arguably is sunken. In a way Waller Creek kind of represents the potential of the High Line on one end and the San Antonio River Walk, a more local precedent, on other end." Steiner served on the governance board for the Waller Creek design competition. "There are several really interesting things about the winning entry," Steiner said. "First, it suggests very smart and doable interventions. Second, the string of parks acts to connect a network, but allows each of the individual parks to develop on its own. Third, the attention to the Eastside."

Most of what makes Waller Creek such a "wicked" problem (the term used in the jury report recommending the MVVA proposal) is tied into the history of Austin, specifically the historically embedded division of East vs. West. The natural division created by Waller Creek was amplified by the decision in the 1920s to officially racially segregate the city along the corridor, later reinforced by the construction of I-35, an uninviting and dangerous physical barrier. "On top of the historical context, the intermittent flooding kept the area relatively undeveloped," Steiner said. "And the city more or less turned its back on Waller Creek."

#### The Paradox of Meddling

a researcher at Austin Water's Center for Environmental Research. "This is just part of what humans do, for better or worse."

"The paradox of meddling in these places is that the ruinous attractions get replaced by planned attractions," Anderson continued. "The proposal designs are all from well-intentioned people imposing their vision of nature on that creek. The creek itself has a much longer history, of which this is just a moment in time."

For nearly a decade, Anderson has been giving talks about Joseph Jones and Waller Creek, regularly referring to his thesis, Marginal Nature: Urban Wastelands and the Geography of Nature. "The first time I did a talk on Joseph Jones, his daughter walked into the room," Anderson said, tinkering with a bolo tie that Jones made from an object he found in the creek. "Since then his two daughters have sort of adopted me. In some ways they think of me as a ghost of their father, because of some strange serendipitous connections."

In 1988, while a UT student, Anderson would often wander the creek while waiting for the bus. He regularly bumped into an old man doing the same - only later did he realize the man was Joseph Jones. By then he'd already become a devotee of Jones's writing, viewing him as a compadre who understood the creek's history and ecology. "I think for someone like Joe or myself, part of the appeal of these sorts of places is how they change," Anderson said. "The regret I have is that our cultural attitudes towards nature inhibit so many people from appreciating what's actually there. I really love the ruinous attraction of that creek, in part because I spent so much time on it and I know the


snapping turtles and the wood ducks and the green herons."

Anderson sees what's happening along the creek fitting perfectly into the persistent dynamic of cities and urbanization. "I lived in New York City in the 1980s when the High Line really was spectacular, before they ripped it apart and replaced it with what they believe should be there for development. And that's what's going to happen to Waller Creek. If you take the long perspective, 100 years from now, will either be maintained?"

#### **Naturally Unnatural**

In the shadow of UT's Darrell K. Royal Texas-Memorial football stadium, I descended into Jones' territory along the creek, at the intersection of 21st and San Jacinto. The foliage was noticeably different here less tropical, woodsier - and the flanking green space was wider. Circumnavigating the stadium regularly to get to school or work has conditioned me to sigh at its towering presence and feel a kinship with the students who, in the 1969 incident hyperbolically recalled as the "Waller Creek Riot," chained themselves to trees in protest of the stadium expansion and the felling of the trees.

During the annual South by Southwest Eco conference last fall, I'd joined a volunteer event in which participants could pick up trash along the creek, make seed balls for planting, or map invasive species. I spent the next two hours with two Amherst College students and our guide, Jessica Strickland, invasive species program manager for the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center. We documented the exact location of these unwelcome trespassers, informa-



tion that would later be added to a database to be referenced when it came time to remove the plants. When we weren't straddling limestone outcroppings, we paused intermittently to admire the scenery. Cypress trees rose through streaks of sunlight, and snakelike root webs hosted turtles trying to catch a ray. Young Texas palmettos spread their fronds like green peacock tails. Behind the Alumni Center, the creek had been manicured by university landscapers – a rich mix of shrubs, bushes, and trees, invasive and indigenous alike.

We encountered a lot of privet, chinaberries, and other interlopers. While I enjoyed the taxonomic education, I didn't see much hope for an indigenous-species-only Waller Creek, and I wasn't convinced it was really worth the effort. Later I asked Anderson how he felt about the notion of invasive species, and he said he doesn't believe that there's a species-correct biological community for a city, when cities by definition completely alter natural ecology. "The natural history of the city is unnatural," he said. "So when you go down to Waller Creek and say these things shouldn't be here and

A better term, he suggests, might be "problem species" – such as giant ragweed, bamboo, or poison ivy, each of which dominates parts of Waller Creek. "This all goes back

to America's obsession with the idea that there was wilderness here, and that it was 'right' once," Anderson said. "The first question is, when was that? And the next question is, some of you want to live in the past and try to manage backwards – but how do we go forwards?"

#### **Trash to Treasure**

To complete my journey, I needed a boat and a loyal shipmate. Together we entered Lady Bird Lake just west of I-35 and made it about 100 yards up the creek, nearly reaching Palm Park, before turning around because of shallow, stagnant, putrid water. As we pivoted, I spotted a snakeskin hanging from a tree that protruded from the large, stone containment wall. Crisco?

Ducking low branches and pushing off submerged logs, we headed back toward Lady Bird Lake. Two cardinals hopped on some enormous reeds, their bright red feathers matching the kayak; together we stood out from the hearty greens and flat blue-greys surrounding us. A rotten scent hung in the low air. As we passed under a timeworn, three-foot diameter pipeline, I thought about how much sewage might be passing overhead, and then about how much might be just inches beneath us.

There are now two striking aspects at the mouth of the creek: a profusion of birds and

a buoyed-off, cofferdam construction site. Cormorants lined the ring of yellow, rectangular barriers floating around the work zone; they took flight, one by one, as we approached. Egrets and great blue herons waded near the riverbank, regal with their long necks and slender heads. The planned outlet facility for the Waller Creek Tunnel, a 50-foot-deep lagoon, will one day quietly inhabit the terrain beneath this part of the lake. The brand new, modern Waller Creek Boathouse nearby is the first indication of the changes to come.

Lady Bird Lake may seem like a slow-moving mass of tranquility as old as time, especially when encountered after paddling through the dilapidated urban gutter that is lower Waller Creek. Yet it too is an artificial, man-made attraction, a dammed stretch of the Colorado River. Called Town Lake until being renamed in 2007, the six-mile lake was created in 1960 with the construction of the Longhorn Dam, to protect against flooding, generate electricity, and establish a reliable water supply. By the 1970s the lake was neglected and overgrown, much like Waller Creek today – but now wide trails,

boat docks, highrise hotels and high-end apartments ring its shoreline, with a new boardwalk soon to be built to complete the trail connection between east and west. Probably more than ever, the lake has become the central artery tying Austin's disconnected neighborhoods together. The revitalization of lower Waller Creek will continue this trend

of Downtown urbanization, bringing more people and activity.

Julie Holden, Joseph Jones' granddaughter, thinks the change will be a good thing. "I think it's really cool," she said. "I don't mind them turning it into a sort of river walk. I think the River Walk in San Antonio is great." Holden, a real estate agent, lives in Austin with her husband and six-year-old daughter. She believes her grandfather would "strongly approve" of the plan to revitalize the area. "He would be thrilled with people taking an interest in this beautiful natural resource that's the heart of the University of Texas campus," Holden told me. "He probably wouldn't approve of the development Downtown though - the 'River Walk' idea would bother him. But he was a balanced guy, and I expect he would feel that if it made it possible for conservancy to happen, then that would help validate it."

Holden remembers Jones as an inveterate tinkerer and master woodworker, who would utilize many of the things he found along the creek. "I have a child's rocking chair that he picked up," Holden said. "He repaired it and added cat faces on the side with a tail going up the back. Now all these years later, it's in my daughter's room. I think this whole idea – that one man's trash is another man's treasure – is very important."



# Notes on a Long, **Long Journey**

The Dragon is a novel almost five years in the works. It may take another five. I keep a *Dragon* journal. Here are entries from this year.

May 4: I cling, as a novelist, to what Orson Welles said: "Who needs plot? But who can live without a story?" And I cling to what John [Cassavetes] told me: "In replacing narrative, you need an idea."

I've always believed that, if you're good enough, you can dispense with a plot (life has no plot) if you focus on behavior. The page-turning tension of plot is replaced by the page-turning interest in behavior: You turn the pages because you're interested in what's going on. Behavior-leads-tobehavior-leads-to-behavior, as in how we live our days, and that is interesting and takes a reader from where you begin to where you end. For a story never really

ends. The storyteller picks a place to begin and a place to end, but, unlike a plot, story is alive before the beginning and after the end. In our days, we live plotless stories inherently interesting, because we're alive. I've always thought, believed, and wrote within this conviction.

I don't know how to write a novel any other way, and I'm not interested in writing a novel any other way, but is it working?

I don't know and can't know. And it's my job to live with that. Live with that, and keep on. But, damn, I'm scared.

May 6: You are responsible for your characters. You've taken responsibility for Willie and the others. The deeper you get into the novel, the larger that responsibility grows. Your characters depend on you for life. They depend on you to tell the truth - their truth as characters - in the

same way that actors are responsible for the truth of their characters. James Cagney said: "You walk in, plant yourself, look the other fellow in the eye, and tell the truth." The story is your own, but the characters are not - they belong to themselves, and it's your job to be true to how they belong to themselves.

May 18: Every time I begin to compose again, I'm nervy as hell - terrified, is what. After all this time, a lifetime, it never goes away. Actors, the real ones, say the same: stage fright every time.

Got to 400 words; thought that was all I had, and there was a tug - two tugs. One said, "Best stop here and sleep on it" t'other one said, "Something you didn't plan on happens here." And then it happened: a change in the scene's structure, small but it counts. Maybe not so small.

It is a privilege to have such work. It calls to you: "Write me, write me." Something unformed, but which nevertheless exists, calls on you to give it form. The artist is a servant of that call.

May 19: Tonight I really had to push past the fear. So goddamn nervous at what the novel tries to do, wants to do. Me, I'm saying, "I know what you want, but can I do it? You sure you got the right guy?" "You're the only one in the room," says the novel.

May 20: There are times when you are unable. Then you just sit, feeling useless. You sit and wait for the novel to tell you what to do.

I waited at least an hour. Finally, the novel spoke up and told me what to do: Retype/refine the raw pages I've written since the 18th. Have all that ready and done for when I return. So I began that.

June 24: Composition, finally, composition, after more than a month. I got almost sick with it, VENTURA with the excitement of facing it. I became nauseous. I didn't try for too much. Just to get the thing going again. Stopped where Hemingway said to stop - best advice he ever gave, to stop when you know what happens next so you can pick it up again with that momentum. I might have pushed on, but my body said, "STOP, lest we get dizzy and fall from the chair."

I wish I could express the thrill of doing this. To be in the midst of what I write, to feel and scent and hear it all, to BE Willie, to be all of them, and how deeply I want it to be true, true, true, and to put the reader in the midst of it, for the reader to be as excited as I am.

**June 29:** As I retyped the new pages, the novel showed me the BIG thing I'd been missing, the BIG thing that must happen in this chapter. It's so obvious, but I didn't see it with my eyes, didn't think it with my mind; not 'til I retyped did my hands feel and know it. What my hands knew threw the chapter open like a window you're about to jump out of.

July 14: Said to Jaz after work was done: "This novel, it really doesn't care about the logic of story. It cares about the illogic of experience.'

August 5: Fun is hard to write. Anyone can write misery, but you've got to be really good to write fun and make it work.

August 7: Don't tell no one, but we're getting at the meaning of life in this here novel. As Margie (of blessed memory) would say, "Fun's fun, fellas, but who shit on my head?"

November 27: In the apartment in the Bronx, when my family had gone to bed (sister and Ma in the bedroom, Vin and Al and me on sofa and floor in the living room), I'd be at the table in the oh-so-narrow kitchen, and I would grow aware of a kind of sinking down, as though my chair and table might be an elevator that had to descend many floors down to where the poetry was, where the poetry lived. Always, since, there's the sense of sinking down and down to the place where the writing is, where it waits.

November 28: Just over two hours of work - not much of a work night - but even with that, the novel is working its way, taking a further step from where it was yesterday. This is immensely, deeply satisfying.

November 30: What S. said, winter of '72, before I went west: "Long, long periods of indecision and suffering, when you don't know which life is your own."

We are but translators of that which flows through us and uses us, uses us to manifest, to become tangible and inhabit the world of others, those others we work for. "For the others!" was the anarchist battle cry in the Spanish Civil War. Artists work for themselves, yes, but the work we do is for the others





# PERFORMANCE JAMBOREE'S 20TH BRINGS BACK OLD FAVES AND WELCOMES NEW STARS

All it takes is a serious milestone like a 20th anniversary to make you want to get the old gang back together. That's how it goes with high school graduations, so why should performance festivals be different? FronteraFest, our annual jamboree of homegrown theatre, poetry, improvised comedy, puppetry, interpretive dance, and everything in between, hits the big 2-0 this January, and one way it's commemorating the occasion is by inviting some former Best of the Fest winners and longtime participants back to present a piece this year. Dubbed the Featured Alums, they offer just one more enticement to give your evenings over to FronteraFest once it begins Tuesday,

One Featured Alum will appear each Thursday night of the Short Fringe – and after two decades, I expect you know the drill: Each night, Tuesdays through Fridays, 8pm, you get five different works of 25 minutes or less, and on Saturday the cream of that week's crop appears in the Best of Week program. Then, the fifth week is devoted to pieces judged Best of the Fest. Here's the schedule of Featured Alums:

**Jan. 17: Cyndi Williams**, playwright/performer – "Songs That Remind Me of My Sister (part two)." The author of the 2005 Long Fringe's *Where Are They Now?* performs one of the essays posted on her Facebook page.

Jan. 24: Zell Miller III, playwright/performer – "oh ... Shhhhhhh ... my alien children are trying to kill me." The author/performer of My child ... my child ... my alien child, first seen at FronteraFest 2005, combines parts of

that show with some more recent tales of fatherhood from his *Oh* ... shit. it's a girl.

Jan. 31: Emily Fordyce, producer —
"I Put My Love Right Cheer So's I
Wouldn't Fergit Where It Was, But
Somebody Stole'd It," by Tooper Tater.
The producer of "Whoom" (2009)
serves "another bowl of Meander Cat
Stew, another Christmas ruined by
Ernest Borgnine, another foot chewed

Feb, 7: Keira McDonald, playwright/performer – "My Arab Spring." The Seattle-based creator of "Astro-Naughty" (2010) and "CockTales" (2011) takes us to a Bedouin village on the Red Sea for true tales of love and adventure from an American girl who lives there.

Also of note in the Short Fringe are the ScriptWorks commissions, with one new work commissioned by the playwrights organization each Wednesday. This year's enlisted writers are Abe Koogler (Jan. 16), Jason Rainey (Jan. 23), Reina Hardy (Jan. 30), and Max Langert (Feb. 6). We're especially intrigued by Rainey's, set in a post-secession Texas being invaded by the Mexican army, with Rick Perry played by legendary local artist-comedian Kerry Awn.

The Long Fringe – shows running 90 minutes or less – follows Jan. 21-Feb. 3, at Salvage Vanguard Theater, 2803 Manor. With only one venue this year – bye-bye, Blue Theater – there are fewer offerings, but they're intriguing as ever. Among the 11 full-length shows are *ICU*, a new dark comedy about life, death,

and marriage, by nationally known playwright Allison Gregory (who also happens to be married to Steven Dietz); Capital T Theatre's local premiere of Gruesome Playground Injuries by Rajiv Joseph, author of Bengal Tiger at the Baghdad Zoo, with direction by accomplished actor Kelsey Kling; West Side Terri, Orange Country theatre artist Terri Mowrey's solo performance of the film of West Side Story; and Turning Tricks With the Darlings, a magic show with 2012 Best of the Fest winners Jack Darling and Trish Sherrer.

And last but never least comes Mi Casa Es su Teatro, the Saturday devoted to site-specific performances in homes and businesses around town. Each year, the mix is curated by a different artist or team of artists, and this year it's playwright/performer Adrienne Dawes (Am I White) and theatrical maven Sam Webber (Mi Casa Es su Teatro 2012). They've already lined up improv queen Shana Merlin (Merlin Works Improv), composer/singer Content Love Knowles (Sleeping Beauty, Criminal Cabaret), actor/director Jenny Larson (Salvage Vanguard Theater), and director-writer Sonnet Blanton and the Popworks gang, and more are coming. The fun happens Saturday, Feb. 9, 11am-7pm, at various locations.

The fest will celebrate the launch of its 20th year with an opening week afterparty on Saturday, Jan. 19, at Gallery Black Lagoon, right across from HPT, with edibles provided by Asti Trattoria, the Parlor, and Beverage World. # V Is for...

#### 'VAGINA' EDITOR-IN-CHIEF HILLARY-ANNE CROSBY ON ZINES, FEMINISM, AND - WELL, YOU KNOW

"I say 'vagina' all the time now," Hillary-Anne Crosby says with a disarming smile. "The whole point of the word is just, here's this sex organ that you have! Or maybe you're male and you wish you had one. But it's not this offensive thing. It's not meant to be."

As if to underscore this point, the founding editor-in-chief of *Vagina*: : The Zine gives off a decidedly nonthreatening vibe in person. Sporting a pixie cut and a crisp white button-down at our interview, Crosby is all dimples and uptalk and aspiring-journalist enthusiasm. But with her provocatively titled zine launching its seventh issue at Cheer Up Charlie's this Saturday, Crosby has proven she's got the huevos to put front and center women's creative work, from poetry to humor to essays on gender politics.

Crosby created *Vagina*: The Zine in 2011 as a homegrown substitute for the journalism internships she couldn't afford while working her way through the University of Texas. "I'd never even seen a zine before," she confesses. The name, originally her own nickname for the ladies-only project, stuck. "I'd been thinking of it that way for so long that I was like, alright, we're going with it. *Vagina*. It'll stand out."

Stand out it does, despite Crosby's goal of normalizing the word. "I get a lot of jokes. People are like, 'I'm going to start *The Gentlemanly Penis*.' And I'm like, 'You should!' But no one's doing it. If I can start a zine, having never seen one ... Zines are the easiest."

Well, maybe not the easiest. As the only editor who still lives in Austin, Crosby prints, folds, and staples each and every issue at her kitchen table. "Sometimes my tears get on it," she laughs. "For a past issue, I used a sewing machine, and there were all these problems where, like, my blood would end up on the design. So it's really blood, sweat, and

tears that go into it."

Crosby views Vagina as an alternative to mainstream women's magazines. "I'm not even trying to be all super-vagina-feminist about this, but I absolutely hate Cosmopolitan. I'll read it and I'll come away really disheartened, not sure how I feel about myself." Nevertheless, Crosby won't be publishing her thoughts on Cosmo in Vagina anytime soon because, in her words, "It would be kind of mean."

If this seems excessively polite, it's all part of Crosby's inclusive stance on feminism. "My definition of feminism is just

respecting and supporting women. I label us a feminist magazine because I think that everything we're doing is respecting and supporting women and their different views. We have girls that write really openly about their sex lives, or their abortions, or their dreams of being a stay-at-home mom. That's what I love about it. *Vagina* is meant to be for that woman who likes who she is."

# **Two Sides to His Story**

Manuel Gonzales leads the nonprofit Austin Bat Cave into uncharted territory while readying for a rapid literary ascent of his own

Austin Bat Cave President S. Kirk Walsh is beaming in a green blouse with big polka dots late on a Monday afternoon at Quack's. Things are busy, and a bright, warm equilibrium exists between the interior and exterior. The light is pristine. Two girls just out of school, Christmas break a hair's breadth away, stand on the sidewalk off of Duval and press their foreheads against the storefront window, making funny faces. It's as if they can sense that Walsh is an ally, a kindred spirit. She waves hello, shrugs, and turns back to the small table. A steaming mug, several books, a map, a set of keys, and a red View-Master are laid out in front of her.

With weather a nonfactor and good vibes going around, the conditions would seem ideal for an expedition. Walsh and her team are setting off on a journey to something called the Center of the Earth Visitors Center, but they won't get there until early spring. And they won't get there at all without a leader. Somebody who can navigate the crust and the layers and the core.

Luckily, she has found just the man for the job.

Manuel Gonzales first made his name in pastry. After graduating from the University of Texas in 1996, he joined his friend Barry Margeson as co-owner of the late Clarksville Pie Company. Gonzales had come to Austin from Plano, where his parents, Juan and Juanita, settled after growing up in the same small West Texas town of Stamford.


Juan, a bright kid with an identity crisis, had never fit in there. When he hung out with the Mexicanos, the whites wanted to fight him; when he was with the whites, the Mexicanos wanted to. He once failed a typing course on purpose because he was tired of suffering the stigma of getting straight A's. Juanita, one of 11 children, dropped out of high school to study cosmetology while working in factories and cleaning houses. Her family would also migrate to California and Colorado to farm cotton, avocados, and strawberries.

By the time Gonzales was a year old, his father had served in the Air Force, worked for the military as a translator of Japanese and Russian, and graduated from UT-Arlington with a journalism degree. Offered reporting beat in Bee Cave, he instead took a job with the IRS out of concern for his young family's financial security.

"That's something that he and my mom both really impressed on both my sister and me: They're giving us opportunities to figure out what we want to do and what we would be good at that would also be financially fulfilling, in addition to being emotionally and mentally fulfilling," Gonzales remembers. "Every time I wonder how it's going to go, I always think back to that."

The "it" he refers to is his writing, or, more specifically, his writing career, which in some sense is inaugurated Jan. 10 with Riverhead's publication of his first book, The Miniature Wife and Other Stories. Piling up comparisons to such debuts as George Saunders' CivilWarLand in Bad Decline and Donald Barthelme's Come Back, Dr. Caligari, the collection is a triumph of the form, a series of lucid dreams induced by what Wells Tower calls a "Borgesian inventiveness" in describing his former classmate's work, and what I would say is more of a warped Chekhovian charm, at once grim and exhilarating.

In the opening "Pilot, Copilot, Writer," the narrator is held hostage on an airborne plane for decades. The audacious title story finds a scientist at war with his wife, each character perpetrating acts that would be unthinkable had their author not thought them up. Two of the best stories run back-to-back late in the collection: "The Disappearance of the Sebali Tribe," as intriguing as the first pages of House of Leaves, finds a graduate student tracking down a pair of anthropologists who have fabricated an entire race, and "One-Horned & Wild-Eyed" is a dark and funny fable. Gonzales' command of genre and his defiance of convention ripple throughout. There are zombie stories, werewolf stories, robot stories, and stories whose outcomes are so chilling they burn. Five "Meritorious Lives" are scattered across the collection, eerie interludes that feel like the funeral director replaced the organ with a theremin.

"Manuel's stories have a crispness that I love," says Mark Binelli, author of Sacco and Vanzetti Must Die! and 2012's acclaimed Detroit City Is the Place to Be. "They're so clean, and every word is so carefully chosen, and the sentences fit together like puzzle pieces, like they came out of a box that way. ... The only contemporary writer who comes to mind whose prose works the same way is Coetzee. And then, with Manuel, that lapidary precision is put in service to such insane imaginative powers. He's truly a unique voice."

"It's me just having a figurative idea that I decide to make literal," Gonzales tells me one night over beers at the Nomad. "The game I like to play is, What If That Actually Did Exist? How Would It Play Out? Usually not very well, and rarely because of the thing itself. More because of the characters. . Why is everybody bereft in my stories? I think that's more interesting in terms of writing a story. Either the situation needs to promise some happiness and the characters need to be unable to grab hold of it, or the situation needs to be devastatingly bad. Like in 'Farewell, Africa,' continents are sinking into the sea, and nobody knows why, and there's this really awful party that they're throwing to commemorate that.

"I like to combine those things. When it comes to the characters - a lot of them most of them are personal faults, and I try to push them as far as I can. Because I feel like there's the opportunity for that in me, and probably in everybody. There are days when we are our worst selves, just as there are days when we are our best selves. But our best selves rarely make for interesting stories. They make for great lives."

In conversation, Gonzales is generous and receptive, albeit with a stop-and-start, throat-clearing delivery. He has leonine eyes. Stout, fidgety, and mischievous, he likes to keep things light and is quick to laugh; questions meant for introspection often bounce off of him and split apart in a hundred different directions. Although he would prefer to discuss the altruistic underpinnings of NBC's The Voice or the gustatory superiority of Uchiko, we are discussing the forecast for his book, because that's what people want to discuss when you have a book coming out soon. And Gonzales, 38, now has a family of his own to consider.

"There's this desire to write all of the time," he says. "And then there are the obligations that I have as a father and a husband. I feel very much down-to-earth about my expectations around the book, that I'll have a certain window to take advantage of whatever it is that comes out of this book beyond the book itself. I want my book to be



successful enough that I am given the freedom to write another one, to get another one published. That will give me the means to then write another one after that. I'll be able to have a certain amount of success as a novelist, but a certain amount of success is still not necessarily enough to sustain a whole lot. I feel like I'm lucky. There are plenty of people who write really interesting work who struggle to even get it seen."

He and his wife, Sharon, a former teacher with a background in theatre, live with their two children in Windsor Park, following a head-spinning whirlwind of peregrinations that took the couple to:

Boston, where they crashed at erstwhile Austin pie maven Margeson's Cambridge house "while I figured out what I wanted to do":

New York City, where, after several false starts with law school and English Ph.D. program applications, he figured out that he "wanted to sit down and make up shit for the rest of my life" and earned an MFA at Columbia;

Austin, where Sharon taught for one tour of duty;

Houston, for another;

Dallas, where they lived with Gonzales's parents, "but we had both grown up near Dallas and didn't like it there, so we moved to Paris";

Paris, Texas, where Gonzales, who had been given a key to a friend's bakery, would toil not by the ovens starting at 5am, but in the silence of an empty cafe; and

Back to Austin, where Sharon had been offered a position at a Bastrop school.

"It is now a family joke," says Sharon, who shouldered the family's financial burdens for much of that time as Gonzales worked unsatisfying odd jobs, accrued student loan debt, and wrote. "Manuel and I often wonder if we will ever 'settle.' We really love being in Austin right now, but

the wanderlust to go somewhere new is pretty strong. There are always moments of hesitancy and concern about the future, for me. I was born to worry. Manuel never worries."

Walsh says this is one reason why she and the board of the Austin Bat Cave – an innovative nonprofit writing and tutoring center, modeled after Dave Eggers' 826 Valencia, that had seen three executive directors in three years and was struggling

to rebrand itself – hired him soon after he returned to town, in August of 2010.

"He's a natural storyteller," says Walsh, an accomplished writer and editor who cofounded ABC and launched its programming in 2007. "His job is crafting the narrative of what Austin Bat Cave is. He has to do that with a lot of different groups: It's for donors; it's for parents. But then he also has to connect with the kids. His passion for the

power of reading and writing helps him really understand the mission, and he's capable of articulating that mission to anybody, all while leading the organization. He's really the face of the organization now."

During a recent staff meeting at Bennu Coffee, Gonzales charted out the Austin Bat Cave's 2013 programming schedule with Program Director Sarah Morrison and

Volunteer Coordinator Katie Angermeier. It

was like a lightning round of official business – one of the most efficient and cordial professional gatherings I have ever witnessed – and the trio covered vast stretches of ground while still finding time for rabbit holes, wisecracking, and nostalgia. They share mutual respect and a true believer's zeal for the organization's aim to empower kids through creative enterprise and expression – an aim that will soon find a permanent home base in a

Cesar Chavez storefront that's benefited from the pro bono work of architect Murray Legge and design studio Lewis Carnegie.

It is there, early this spring, where they'll finally reach the Center of the Earth Visitors Center. Like 826 Valencia's Pirate Supply Store in San Francisco, Superhero Supply Co. in Brooklyn, and Time Travel Mart in Los Angeles, the Austin Bat Cave's retail space – featuring hyperstylized maps, interactive edu-

cational games, beautiful anthologies of the students' efforts, and spelunking gear full of kitsch and kids-of-any-age friendliness – will serve as a whimsical gateway to the organization's nonacademic enrichment programs.

"The timing of Manuel's book, taken with the new storefront – it's going to be a defining moment for us," Walsh says. "We have a little bit more momentum now, and we're moving on to our next phase in terms of what we're going to be able to do with the new space, raising more money and reaching more children, helping more teachers. We'll be able to develop a robust afterschool program. We have developed a reputation, but the storefront is really going to help. It's concrete: People will see it."

Gonzales says that when Sharon was still teaching, he would always tell the students jokes during visits to her classroom, and the students wouldn't laugh. "They would never get them," he says. "Or me. They would never understand what to do with me."

But when students read his writing, they seemed to get it completely.

"I showed them a highlighted copy up on the screen of 'Escape From the Mall,' and I had the text in different colors," he says. "I told them, 'You know, this is where I started. And you'll see that this is, like, three-quarters of the way into the actual story, and I didn't write the beginning until almost the end.

"I didn't want to leave it up there, because there's some language in there, and also



I mention that he sounds like a young person fresh off of his first Austin Bat Cave experience, and he nods. He talks about what a wretched writer he was as a high schooler, how he wouldn't read anything worthwhile, how he had no idea where his life would lead him. And then one morning, he woke up wanting to tell a story, and he hasn't stopped wanting to since.

"Whenever I'm working with kids, I try to express to them that we process just about everything in our lives as a narrative, as some kind of story," Gonzales says. "It's just a matter of what kind of symbols we use to create that story. I think it's really weird that we're able to put black and white symbols on a piece of paper and somehow, if we're lucky, elevate them so that they're not that anymore. You forget for a while that you're actually reading; you get immersed in the story.

"I think I'm really good at helping people figure out where they want to go with their work, getting to the heart of what they're trying to do, and then giving them suggestions on how to get there." He looks me right in the eye. "How to articulate your own story when you're out in the world."



I suspect that the Marquis de Sade and Eric Idle would have gotten along nicely if they'd ever met. As the latter once intoned: "Isn't it awfully nice to have a penis? You can wrap it up in ribbons; you can slip it in your sock. But don't take it out in public, or they will stick you in the dock." As Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Doug Wright demonstrates in Quills, the latest offering from Different Stages, the infamous de Sade suffered such a fate for indecent exposure of the pornography in his mind.

From his cell at Charenton Asylum, the wayward old pervert de Sade (Craig Kanne) prolifically writes - and disseminates, via chambermaid Madeleine (Melissa Vogt-Patterson) - the sort of inflammatory novels that got him locked up in the first place. The madhouse's keepers, Abbé de Coulmier (Joe Hartman) and Doctor Royer-Collard (Travis Bedard), determined to "protect malleable minds from pernicious influence," attempt to censor the offender by any means necessary. But

though they confiscate the author's quills (and I don't just mean writing implements), they fail to silence him.

Wright's gothic script abides in the darkest corners of comedy; much like Killer Joe or Sweeney Todd, it should be an uncomfortable experience that wrinkles your nose as it beckons a belly laugh. Unfortunately, in the hands of Artistic Director Norman Blumensaadt, the unsettling story falls somewhat limply into the audience's lap.

The genre is so macabre that it requires a certain amount of stylized acting, lest we find it too real and forget to laugh. But this cast's tendency to overact bogs down much of the script's wry humor; the audience does not, for example, need hand gestures to accompany the majority of this play's many innuendos. At some points, I felt I was being treated like a child who couldn't be trusted to get all the jokes. Ann Marie Gordon's set, though attractive and pleasantly complemented by Patrick Anthony's dramatic lighting and Ann Ford's period costumes, restricts the City Theatre's already small stage, leaving a no-man's-land at center. It forces much awkward staging that, along with generally slow pacing, makes the play feel very long and very wordy.



As the flamboyant de Sade, Craig Kanne must be applauded for sheer guts - there aren't many local actors-of-a-certain-age who could be enlisted to parade around in their birthday suits for half a play. Kanne's performance is certainly a labor of love. but played at counterpoint with the deep emotional center that Joe Hartman found in the earnest Abbé, the Marquis sometimes feels like a caricature. The excellently coiffed Tony Salinas is a bit-part highlight, his boundless energy surfacing periodically.

Though Quills boasts more euphemisms for that firm javelin than the Monty Python crew could dream of, this production doesn't quite rise to the occasion. - Jillian Owens

A dark and stormy night. A mysterious castle. Hideaway bookcases. A wall laden with weapons. An egotistical host. A gaggle of snarky thespians. A dead theatre critic. Everything you need for the perfect holiday soiree.

Actually, Ken Ludwig - the playwright behind the stagedall-over Lend Me a Tenor and soon-to-be-seen-at-City Theatre Moon Over Buffalo - has assembled the elements of a crackerjack whodunit farce in this 2011 effort. Drawing on the life of William Gillette – whose stage play about Sherlock Holmes proved so popular, he toured it for more than 30 years - Ludwig has the actor host a Christmas party for his cast at the Connecticut castle that Gillette really designed and built with the fortune he made playing the great detective. These being thespians for whom all the world's a stage – they can't resist spouting Shakespeare, no matter where they are - there's plenty of ham being served, liberally sauced with backstage gossip and catty asides. But Ludwig also mixes in an attempt on Gillette's life and that venomous critic who

everyone hates, and when she turns up dead - in the drawing room with a dagger - the affair goes all Clue-ish, with Gillette donning the deerstalker for real to catch the killer.

It's all in good fun. Seriously. This is the sort of bloodless mayhem that occurs only in country-manor murder mysteries, which Ludwig is mocking - going so far as to make one comic set-piece of the stabbing victim's inability to communicate to Gillette that a blade is stuck in her spine, and another of Gillette and an actor pal dragging the body from one hiding place to another to conceal it from a police inspector with more than a passing resemblance to Agatha Christie's Miss Marple, English accent and all.

However, for the play's regional premiere, Austin Playhouse isn't having nearly as much fun as it could.

The setup encourages a production drenched in style: tony Broadway types in glamorous Thirties formal wear, a posh bash with Champagne flowing like the Connecticut River, a castle mansion so swank that every visitor is compelled to comment on it. But while the gowns from costume designer Diana Huckaby offer some period flair, the show overall is otherwise unfortunately short on glitz. The castle interior that one character describes as "where God would live - if He could afford it" lacks luxe - or even the polish seen in so many other Playhouse sets.

Artistic Director Don Toner has cast the show well, and his actors are, in a word, game, but they don't always take advantage of the heightened acting style that the Thirties setting affords, leaving these show folk a little less bright than they could be and the shtick a little less crisp. There's also surprisingly little tension in the characters' relationships, so the sense of motivation for murder and mutual suspicion doesn't go very deep. There's some capable work and pleasure to be found here, but even in a mystery played for laughs, the crime needs to be grounded in genuine emotion, or the question "Who done it?" becomes "Who cares?" - Robert Faires

#### Herd the Third: More Concerti by Bach for Multiple Harpsichords First Presbyterian Church, 8001 Mesa Sunday, Jan. 6

After two years in which La Follia's early-January concerts of harpsichord music by J.S. Bach played to capacity crowds, you'd figure the lesson for the next follow-up would be: "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." And certainly Herd the Third: More Concerti by Bach for Multiple Harpsichords served up much of the same reedy keyboard goodness that entertained audiences so mightily in the previous two programs - indeed, it featured a reprise of the Concerto in A Minor for Four Harpsichords and Strings from the original 2011 Bach's Herd of Harpsichords concert (played with the same infectious vigor as before).

But Artistic Director Keith Womer – who playfully welcomed audiences to this Herd wearing a cowboy hat - couldn't resist tweaking the program a bit. In addition to the Bach,

he included a contemporary work for four harpsichords and strings by a modern master of the instrument. Asako Hirabayashi. It was a bold departure from the usual stately progressions and rococo runs, and from the first notes - the strings sounding anguished and dissonant - there was no mistaking the era; this was our time. The harpsichords soon followed suit, anxiously plucking odd notes and skittering like spiders, with the occasional lyrical run. The shift in style was initially jarring, but Womer had asked that we keep our minds open.

and if you met the work on its own terms, it offered distinct pleasures: the tense curtain of notes that the harpsichords formed in the second movement, behind which a melody took shape, overseen by moody, regretful strings; the third movement's spirited violin part - given charming gypsy flourishes by Veronika Vassileva - and the jaunty race of the harpsichords seemingly recovered from the score of a Sixties British film. Hirabayashi's concerto (on which she joined Womer, Jeffrey Jones-Ragona, and JiMin Kim at the keyboards) proved there's life in the old instrument yet – and room for more than Bach in La Follia's Herd. But we think that Johann Sebastian would approve. - R.F.





#### **CZARMAZING!**

I've always been fascinated by the **Romanov Dynasty** that ruled

Russia for 300 years. The tales of the fabulous

wealth left me eager to dig

up every related book, movie,

or image. After seeing the movie

Nicholas and Alexandra, I was totally besotted. The tales of the bullets being deflected - as the Russian royal family was slaughtered – by the massive jewels the women had sewn inside their clothes grabbed me by the throat and wouldn't let go. Where the jewels wound up is a tale in itself, but suffice to say that the Russian Crown Jewels are spectacularly magnificent, and in the hands of the Russian Diamond Fund. So, recently, I was surprised to receive a press release for the United States Geological Survey (www.usgs.gov), a science organization that provides impartial information on the health of our ecosystems and environment. How it fits into the story of the Romanovs is rather interesting. A gentleman named **George F. Kunz** (1856-1932) was a mineralogist, gemologist, and gentleman explorer who happened to be an employee of

inventory. Kunz also had in his library an earlier documentation of the jewels, published in 1922, called "Russian Diamond Fund." Everything that was in the 1925 "official" documentation is in the 1922 publication ... but there are four photos in the 1922 book that are not in

the 1925 publication. The four errant pieces include a grand sapphire and diamond tiara, a sapphire and diamond bracelet, a triple-strand emerald necklace, and a big, fat, juicy sapphire brooch in the shape of a bow. The jewels were worn by the Romanov royal family (1613-1917) until they were seized by the new government during the **Russian Revolution** and secured in secret until 1922. The "Russian Diamond Fund" album dates to the same year, and the photographs appear to have been part of the initial inventory. The brooch was known to have been sold in 1927, but it, along with the other gems, have since vanished. And now? The hunt is on.

Speaking of jewels, and therefore local gems, let me tell you about **Ticketbud.com**. When **Jacki Oh** and I were producing my **Eleven Eleven/Hospice Austin** fashion show last fall, we had to find a ticketing agent through which to sell tickets. Upon

searching, the first one to pop up was Ticketbud. I liked their presentation, pricing, and the note that said. "We are particularly passionate about cancer research and relief, so much so that any event funding cancer research or relief uses Ticketbud for free." I didn't even look at another agency after that. I wrote asking if they would waive their fees since it was indeed a cancer-related benefit. The immediate reply was, "Yes, of course." Turned out I was dealing directly with the owner, Paul Cross, whose mother had recently died after struggling with cancer. Compassionate, caring, and willing to help any way possible, Paul smoothed the way for us. I liked that the website said, "We believe in simplicity and working for people fairly. We don't believe there's a legitimate reason to add additional fees to ticket sales, or to pass those fees on to the customer." For a flat fee, this self-service ticketing app gives you an event page with all your info on it and lets you sell as many tickets as you'd like. You can also track who bought tickets, at what price, and how many. As an attendee, you register, pay, and print your tickets online. I wrote to Mr. Cross thanking him for his incredible service and kindness, and for providing such a simple way for our guests to obtain tickets. Then and only then did I realize that, while they can sell tickets worldwide, Ticketbud is - get this - locally owned and operated. Faaaaabulous.

#### **Pinthouse Pizza**

Among the most anticipated restaurant openings of 2012 was Burnet Road's Pinthouse Pizza. Neighborhood chat lists bubbled with speculation, fed by regular status updates from the embryonic restaurant's Facebook account. Microbrews and pizza: What could be more appealing for the urban families of North Central Austin? And when it finally opened in October, crowds clamored to try out the goods.

Austin is still having a honeymoon with Pinthouse Pizza because it is definitely a friends-and-family kind of place. It's noisy (maybe a little too noisy), casual to the extreme, and equipped with plenty of televisions to catch whatever game happens to strike your fancy. Do bring plenty of quarters, because your kids, if you have them, will spend most of their time at the arcade games, playing Donkey Kong or pinball.

The ordering is a little awkward. Pinthouse operates more like a bar than a restaurant. You order food from one line and beer from another. It's almost as if the owners, who are clearly more interested in brewing than cooking, still haven't quite committed to the restaurant side of the business – or it could be that one hand is not talking to the other. Whatever the logic behind the dual cashiers, dining is better in groups that divide and conquer.

Pinthouse's shaggy-headed brewer, Joe Mohrfeld, is usually on hand to talk about beer, the brewing process, or each beer's colorful backstory. With five or six different beers of their own, plus a voluminous roster from other microbreweries, choosing just one glass of suds can be daunting. I recommend a flight, which allows you to

sample four or five different beers at a time. I liked Pinthouse's Fallen Cask IPA, a high-alcohol beer with a little more malt than one typically expects from an IPA. And the chocolaty Admiral Stout pairs well with a yeasty pizza pie. Hop heads won't be disappointed: the Calma Muerta Session Ale has plenty of bite.

As for the food, I won't say it's the best pizza in town, but I think it is good. And paired with a pint of homebrew, I find little not to like. Pinthouse's friendly din makes it an easy place to settle into some good ol' American comfort food. Pizzas come in three sizes, with the smallest (generally in the \$7 range) designed for a solo diner. The crusts here are thicker than I typically like, but nonetheless have a pleasant yeasty flavor. Pies can be custom-designed to suit a variety of tastes or ordered from the Specialty Pies menu.

I was excited by the sound of the Armadillo Pie, with sausage, ricotta, poblano peppers, and cilantro (\$14.50 medium). But in the end, the peppers were just not spicy enough and the sausage just not sharp enough. Pizza should have big flavors; this one did not. On the other hand, the Cannonball (\$14 medium), an all-meat pizza with Italian sausage, ham, bacon, and pepperoni, had plenty of gravitas. The biggest surprise, however, was the macaroni-and-cheese pizza. I admit, I thought this sounded gross, but I tried it and I found it startlingly tasty - essentially a cheddary macaroni and cheese with a side of crusty bread, only the bread is served underneath it.

They also offer a nice selection of salads (\$5-\$8) and a few appetizers, such as aleinfused queso (\$3.75) and soft pretzels (\$3) to satisfy peripheral urges. But Pinthouse is first and foremost a microbrewery. Go for the beer; food is optional. - Rachel Feit

Joe Mohrfeld's Journey to Texas

When I arrive at **Pinthouse Pizza** in the Iull between lunch and dinner, **Joe Mohrfeld**, the brewpub's head brewer, is in the middle of a conversation with a regular customer, a member of the

**Austin Zealots** homebrewers club. The two are at the bar, just yards away from the brewing equipment on prominent display. The stainless steel tanks contrast sharply with the long, wooden tables and exposed brick walls. I don't dare interrupt. This face-to-face interaction is precisely what Joe moved to Texas for.

Joe only arrived in Austin this past February, but brewheads have been buzzing about him since before his first barrel here could even be tapped. "I'm kind of new, and I feel like almost everyone I meet is in that same boat," he observed. For a new guy, he's been busy. The events he hosted during Austin Beer Week sold out, and recently he was invited to speak at a panel hosted by **Hops & Grain**. Joe comes to ATX from the respected, family-owned mountain brewery **Odell**

**Brewing** in Fort Collins, Colo. He started as a volunteer there while he pursued a master's in communication studies. "I chose where I went to grad school based on the access to craft beer," he said.

"A professor of mine in college got me into homebrewing," he said about his time as an undergrad philosophy major. "I always felt like I needed an artistic outlet growing up, but I never could find the right one: music or drawing or writing. Writing was more difficult than it was a release. Brewing just made sense to me."

He carried this passion for beer into nearly every aspect of his life in Colorado. His master's thesis analyzed the culture created through branding from **New Belgium Brewing**. "Gone are the days of passive consumption," he wrote. "As we enter this postmodern terrain we find ourselves lacking a sense of place, a sense of place that can only be recovered through the choices we make in the everyday. Consumers are beginning to consume even necessary items based on the narrative being told about the product. The gallon of milk versus the gallon of milk with a story [...] the choice is becoming one of identification with a narrative rather then pure consumption."

"I got to the end of grad school and decided I didn't want to be an academic," he said. "I wanted to be a brewer." Instead of pursuing a Ph.D., he worked his way up through packaging to head brewer at Odell. He led a team of brewers at a great brewery, he met a lovely lady who also had a passion for the alcohol business, and he was named one of the 20 most eligible bachelors in craft beer. What would knock loose a man who seemed to have it all and bring him down to his first summer with three-digit temperatures?

"I knew I wanted to be in a brewpub, to be in a smaller system with creative freedom, having that one-on-one interaction with the people drinking your beer," said Joe. "It's really fun for me to get that feedback. I get to sell my beer to people and watch them

drink it." The vision of the five owners of Pinthouse Pizza appealed to Joe's ideas about community and culture in the craft beer experience, as well as his upbringing around the restaurant business. "If you're going to be part of the community, historically that's at a pub.

For us, it's this Rosedale/Allandale neighborhood."

"It's where I want to be in my professional life and personal life." He said the conversation with his girlfriend, a bona fide foodie, went something like this:

"What do you think about moving to Austin, Krystal?"

"Texas or Minnesota?" [Joe is originally from the area around Austin, Minnesota.]

"Texas."

"Cool." That's what she had heard about Austin, that it was a cool place to be. "The Austin breweries can't make enough beer," they'd heard. It was an easy sell.

"What you had in Colorado was a lot of established breweries, that first wave of craft breweries from about 15 years ago," said Joe. "People are making great beer in Colorado, but it's not my generation."

"Texas is never somewhere I thought I would've moved, growing up in Minnesota," he said. "[But] it seems like there's a lot of creative types moving here. That's what keeps a town fresh and innovative."



Her larder is also stocked with Dos Lunas cheeses, Coyote Creek eggs, and dairy items from Mill-King, plus local sodas, snacks, condiments, oils, chocolates, and more. Retail offerings include home and beauty lines, plus clothing, jewelry, and accessories. # **Trading One 'Community'** for Another

#### DAN HARMON IS TALKING TO YOU by Shawn Badgley

Canceled sitcoms litter the network landscape. Fired showrunners and head writers hop on and off vehicles up and down the line, limping under bindles full of spec scripts and napkin notes. This much has been true for television immemorial.

But when the creator of a beloved - albeit commercially underperforming - show is canned, and that show somehow keeps moving without him, people pay attention. Especially when he's seeking that attention out.

In the spring of 2012, Sony Pictures Television declined to renew Dan Harmon's contract even as NBC was renewing Community for a fourth season. Though controversial, it was almost fait accompli. Harmon had cultivated a reputation as a brooding, difficult, and demanding executive producer, one more likely to respond to the feedback of a devoted viewer in the middle of nowhere than he was to that of staff members or studio execs. And his embrace of a blogcentric mode of expression - where he could meet admirers and critics of the cerebral, quixotic, pop-cultureobsessed, and, well, dorky Community on their own turf - did not endear him to the higher-ups.

"I would have fired me," Harmon told KCRW's The Business last year. "They're not going to hand the ball to the guy that spent three years losing in the ratings race and not turning a script over until I felt it was finished. If your ratings are high and there's money being made, you're allowed to be a perfectionist in television."

Nearly a year later, it hardly seems to matter that they weren't, there wasn't, and he won't be. The start of Community's fourth season has been postponed from October of 2012 to this February, and while Harmon has neither forgiven nor forgotten - his Reddit IAmA in August, for instance, brooked no quarter - he has moved on: to the raucous quasi-weekly podcast Harmontown (www.harmontown.com) with improvisational titan Jeff B. Davis, as well as to projects for Adult Swim, CBS, and Fox, and to a collaboration with Charlie Kaufman on the screenwriter's stop-motion Anomalisa.

The Chronicle spoke with Harmon by phone in the weeks leading up to the Harmontown tour, which stops in Austin on Friday, Jan. 11, at the Cap City Comedy Club.

Austin Chronicle: I think a lot of people will be glad that you've got so much going on in the wake of what happened with Community and NBC/Sony. But I was watching the keynote that you gave at the XOXO Festival, which was great and really fascinating to me, and some of the language that you used to describe the network aesthetic and trajectory almost implied that you would never take part in it again. Dan Harmon: I feel like TV, by nature, if you're doing it right, you're doing it right for everyone watching. TV is designed to be loved and watched by as many people as possible. Obviously, the more people watching what you're putting on, the more successful you are. But then we have this fork in the road, where we have come to believe that in order for something to be watched by truly everyone, it has to start taking things from the quality column, integrity column, the humanity column. You have to have someone in a singing contest, who, if they're not the best singer, they have to eat a moose's balls or something. And then the audience gets to vote. And we have to turn everything on television into professional sports in order to keep people watching; we can't keep telling stories. I would want to try to prove that false. I don't particularly care if I die trying, because the trying is the passion, the compulsion for me.

When Steve Irwin was alive, and he talked about a crocodile, he'd probably warn you a great deal about how messed up a crocodile could make you if he got his mouth over you. But he wanted to be among them. He respected them and chose to just hang out with crocodiles constantly. If he gave a keynote about them, I think he'd say, "Well, they have razorsharp teeth, and they can take your leg off,

and they're never going to change, and they don't give a crap about us." But he'd be wearing a T-shirt that says "I Love Crocodiles." It's sort of the same dynamic. And I, like Steve Irwin, will probably be dead very soon.

AC: What makes you say that? You describe yourself in the context of Harmontown, on the show's website, as a "self-destructive writer," which, as you know, goes for a lot of writers in general. So, what makes you particularly selfdestructive these days?

**DH:** Probably nothing more than any other writer, possibly any other person. I speak first and think later. I try to keep as little difference as possible between what's going on in my head and what's coming out of my mouth. ... I alternate between being a perfectionist and hating myself and everything I write. It's nothing really new to this world, but the reason why I bother to say self-destructive is because it lets people know that you know, so that they can stop thinking about it.

There's such an emphasis in our culture on succeeding. If someone's saying something to you that sets them up for failure, 50 percent of your brain is occupied with, "How can I help this person be more successful, how can I point out to them that what they're doing will ultimately not help them succeed?" I think it's helpful to put a big hat on your head that says "I'm gonna self-destruct, so stop worrying about me being successful and start listening to what I'm saying." I keep getting fired, but my house keeps getting bigger. I don't worry about success. Fuck success. Watch me self-destruct and enjoy it, because that's how you'll get a good TV show.

# **Snakes and Ladders**

'The Man From Orlando' team recalls the high stakes of making their lo-fi first feature

"It's all fun and games until you end up in a snake-infested lake having a nervous breakdown." If there are life lessons that can only be learned from making movies, actor Jason Newman has surely hit on one of them.

Newman, who plays the title character in the 2012 Austin-based indie comedy The Man From Orlando, describes the moment when his director and co-writer Craig Elrod waded into armpit-level water in order to drag uncooperative rowboats into position for one of the film's crucial scenes. "There were definitely water moccasins out there, and Craig's out there pushing the boat. There's just something about where we got to at that point. The stress came to a head."

After a long road that led through junkyards, porn shops, and, yes, snake-infested waters, The Man From Orlando will screen for the first time in Austin on Saturday, Jan. 12, at the Stateside at the Paramount. Although Elrod has been directing shorts since he graduated from the University of Texas in 2005, The Man From Orlando is his first full-length feature film. Elrod began co-writing the screenplay with Newman after winning a SXSW Jury Award for his short "Petting Sharks" in 2010.

In The Man From Orlando, Newman portrays a man saddled with the burden of repeatedly explaining that he is named Orlando, not from Orlando. Returning to his hometown of Priddy, Texas, after a stint with a ring of criminal off-duty lifeguards, Orlando confronts his past in the form of his dysfunctional family, his Olympic swimmer ex-girlfriend Virginia (Lee Eddy), and a gaggle of hapless volunteer firefighters. But Orlando's two pasts collide when his former partner-in-crime Kip (Alan Metoskie) follows him to town, resulting in a showdown that prominently features fanny packs, wayward rowboats, and a single handgun.

Elrod, who spent a significant part of his childhood on his father's farm in Elgin, shrugs off the close encounter with water moccasins. Still, the boat scene - the very first that Elrod wrote - seems to stand in for many of the challenges presented by the sheer scale of the film. With more than 40 locations and almost 100 scenes. The Man From Orlando is absurdly ambitious for a local film that, as Elrod states, was "made for the price of a used car." Producer  $Michael\,Bartnett\,(who\,is\,also\,the\,\textit{Chronicle}\xspace's$ assistant webmaster) says that they could never have completed a film of *The Man* From Orlando's scale without the help of friends in the Austin film and acting communities. Elrod agrees, adding, "We had garage sales to raise money. Everyone was willing to let us overstay our welcome when

we were shooting in their bar. None of the actors got paid."

About those actors. Although at its heart the film is a kind of buddy-pic love triangle between Orlando, Virginia, and Kip, a bevy of talented Austin comedians fill out a large supporting cast that features local favorites

John Merriman and Byron Brown of the improv troupe Bad Boys. By turns a criminal caper, an updated Western, and a sweet romantic comedy, the film's wide-ranging plot provides plenty of room for big performances, including a profane, mulleted wild man named "One-Eyed Don," a semaphore-

obsessed lifeguard, and a bartender who refuses to make anything but Long Island Iced Teas.


While this zany cast of characters provides plenty of laugh-out-loud moments, the locations themselves function like quieter punchlines set in the background of each shot: the cheap motel, the YMCA, the bar where locals park themselves under the same neon beer signs night after night. Even the half-finished houses on newly developed plots suggest perpetually deferred hopes of upward mobility in a small town; one belongs to Orlando's brother Romeo (played by Chris Doubek), who dreams of being Priddy's mayor, but seems doomed to be forever mayor pro tem.

It seems natural to attribute the film's keen use of local color at least partially to the writers' childhood experiences in small-town Texas; while Elrod was chasing greased pigs in Elgin (no, really), Newman was growing up in Gladewater, population 6,000. "I definitely think there's an awkward humor that runs through a lot of what we do," Elrod says. "There's a lot of funny stuff going on, living in Texas. They're a little backwards, but sweet in their way."

Newman qualifies this statement by saying, "I think people are ridiculous pretty much wherever you go." However, he admits that he is "familiar with that mentality, what isolation of a community does. Those personalities seem to be

more believable in a small town, if there's people with these really quirky ideas about what it is to be a volunteer firefighter as opposed to a real firefighter, their nemesis. And then the coincidences, too, Just going to a bar and running into the girl that you dated 15 years ago."









While *The Man From Orlando* has screened at the Cincinnati Film Festival and the Lone Star Film Festival in Fort Worth, the film was a disappointing near miss on the Austin festival circuit. Looking for an in-town venue to screen the film, producer Michael Bartnett approached the Paramount's film programmer, Stephen Jannise, and was pleased when Jannise offered a sponsored screening at the Stateside.

Jannise, formerly a programmer for the Austin Film Festival, was particularly impressed with Newman and Eddy's work onscreen. "I think Craig got two really great performances out of the two of them, and that balances the film out and lets everyone else let their oddball flag fly while Jason and Lee keep it grounded in a story that's almost moving."

This undercurrent of intimacy keeps the film from getting lost in its own considerable quirkiness. Eddy, Newman, and Metoskie first met as undergraduates at St. Edward's University, which accounts for the rapport between the two men, as well as the added poignancy in scenes between Newman's soft-spoken slacker and Eddy's laid-back, easygoing tomboy.

Asked about the mostly male cast and crew, Eddy says, "Craig Elrod, he signed my marriage license. And Jason Newman performed my marriage ceremony [to fellow cast member Macon Blair]. ... These are my besties."


Eddy, who moved from Austin to New York several years ago, speaks movingly of her last day on camera, shooting a poolside scene with Newman in a YMCA. "It was really sad. I didn't want to leave. And at the same time, there was also something kind of magical about it, because it was so quiet and the water was so still, with the smell of chlorine in the air, sitting next to one of my best friends, Jason, getting ready to wrap it. There was a definite sort of correlation of moving on, not just for this character Virginia, but also moving for me. Like, that's a wrap, now you gotta leave Austin and you gotta leave this movie and dive in and swim your lap and try not to drown. You've got this one chance to get a good dive in. There's a metaphor there." She laughs, then adds, "Like a baptism of sorts."

Elrod's dunk in the lake could be seen as a baptism, too – not a quiet, peaceful one, but a messy, ritual induction into the chaotic world of feature filmmaking. The way he describes his directing experience sounds transformative at times. "I'm kind of an uncomfortable person. But once you get going into that kind of thing, you just kind of forget yourself. It's the only time I've been able to address crowds of actors. You don't even think about it anymore. I kind of forget myself."


Although Elrod isn't ready to talk about his next project yet, he has some ideas about directions he wants to go in. "I want to back off the dialogue a little bit and try and do something a little bit more ... not [about] a guy with a crazy job. Slow it down and do some relationship stuff." Pause. "Something without 90 scenes."

And presumably no boats will be involved.

# **Winter Harvest**

As of press time, I've been at shows for 14 straight nights. My ears are ringing, I'm woefully underslept, and I've eaten way too many slices of **Hoeks Death Metal Pizza**. I've never felt better in my life.

The vital signs of the local music scene are good too. There's no better time to assess that than **Free Week**, where the cash box stays shut and bands sweat, strum, and scream in front of big crowds to make their mark on 2013.

For aficionados and rank amateurs alike, Free Week's all about discovery. If you do it right, you'll find yourself in an unfamiliar venue being blown away by a band that isn't even the one you came to see. Follow the crowds, follow the sounds, follow your friends, or just stumble around surveying the vast assembly of local talent until you find your new favorite band.

"It's like **South by Southwest** for local bands and local people," says **Transmission** 

#### Entertainment's Graham Williams

Williams didn't intend to start a citywide tradition when he created Free Week in 2002. Then booking Emo's, he devised a string of free concerts to fill the club during a week that's typically hard to book due to the holidays and bad weather. Ancient copies of the Chronicle list locals including Lower Class Brats, Those Peabodys, and Super Heavy Goat Ass, though it wasn't promoted as "Free Week." SXSW's James Minor, another former Emo's booker, believes that the following year was when it became an annual event. That year's lineup featured Pink Swords, Britt Daniel, and the still Free Tweakin' Tia Carrera.

Over the next couple years, the event expanded to both of Emo's stages. When Williams left Emo's and started Transmission, **Mohawk** and **Red 7** began booking Free

Week shows, and other Downtown clubs followed suit. Participation with venues all across town has become so general that charging money for a show during the first week of January has actually become rare. Interestingly, Williams feels no sense of ownership over Free Week, which involves

more than 300 bands in 25 venues this year

"It's cool that all the clubs book their own Free Week, because it's made it bigger and a better experience for fans," Williams commented by phone. "Honestly, I'm shocked that other places like Houston and Dallas don't do it."

Even for a heavyweight booking agent like Williams, Free Week offers a massive showcase of undiscovered talent. "I see a ton of locals for the

first time during Free Week. We have a couple bands playing at **Fun Fun Fun** this year that I saw at last year's Free Week."

While this year's festivities brought several festival-sized touring bands, including NYC crust punk vets **Leftover Crack**, who played to a capacity crowd at **Beauty Ballroom** last Saturday, and lysergic beach-pop quintet the **Growlers**, the lion's share of the Free Week lineup remains local acts.

When I ran into **Paul Waclawsky**, singer/guitarist for the **Boxing Lesson**, at the space rock trio's crowded Sunday set at Mohawk, he was buzzing on a Free Week high.

"It's a very electric time in Austin, when people are extraordinarily open to finding new bands to support," he exclaimed. "The Boxing Lesson makes new, lasting fans at this time each year."

During a Free Week show last year, 14-year-old drum wiz **Ben Redman** saw the Boxing Lesson play for the first time. Now he's their drummer.

Waclawsky admits that bands are paid little – sometimes nothing – for Free Week performances, but the Boxing Lesson still plays four Free Week shows every year for the exposure and large crowds.

"It's good for selling merch and making new fans, so it all balances out in the end," he explains. "More importantly, it brings the scene together in a unique way, and it really sets the tone for the upcoming year of local music."



#### **Half Notes**

- > After four years of shimmying at Shangri-La, the **Second Sunday Sock Hop** jumps to the **White Horse**. The popular dance party, where Breakaway Records owner Gabe Vaughn (aka Secondliner), White Ghost Shivers frontman Wes Borghesi (Shorty Stump), and veteran DJ Tim Murphy (Timurphy) hit gussied-up patrons with an electric shock of vintage vinyl, has become an Eastside institution. Launching at the Longbranch six years ago, the SSSH shook the Scoot Inn before finding a home at Shangri-La. Not surprisingly, neighboring residents prefer quiet to an exquisite selection of rock & roll, soul, R&B, doo-wop, and girl groups. "We've been jumping through hoops and bending over backward to keep everybody cool," says Vaughn, "but it got to a point where it was taking a hit on our numbers." Sunday, the show debuts at the Horse, and owner Denis O'Donnell views the partnership as logical. "Anything that gets a room full of people dancing and having a good time is what we do best," he says. "Sure, our bread and butter is country, but if you don't like soul music, you don't have two ears on your head."
- > Billy Gibbons made the most of his stay in Austin, ringing in the new year with Willie **Nelson** at the **Moody** and dropping in on Gregg Allman there two nights later. The next evening, the **ZZ Top** frontman appeared at **Strange Brew Lounge Side** during the first night of Van Wilks' weekly residency. Recalling his time crashing on Wilks' couch, he explained the genesis of their co-written track "Drive by Lover," which Wilks sang with Christopher

**Cross.** Later that night, he checked out **Ben Kweller**'s set at the Continental Club. Friday, Gibbons jammed on two songs with **Mike Flanigin** at the **Continental Gallery**. Gibbons' early band, Houston psychedelic blues rockers the **Moving Sidewalks**, reunites for a concert in Manhattan on March 30.

# Sad Music for Somber People

#### Toasting My Education and its dearly departed

Death lives in the imagination. Even the most well-adjusted of us slip into daily correspondence with thoughts of the end, from the size and splendor of our funeral to that secret, idyllic spot our ashes should be scattered.

An Austin act seemingly tailored to a funeral procession, My Education formed locally more than a decade ago. Its instrumental crescendos come incorporated with strings and electronics to such a degree that the enterprise doesn't feel tethered to late-Nineties "post-rock."

"It's sad music for somber people," deadpans violist James Alexander, 45, at a December pig roast the weekend following a release party for the band's latest disc, A Drink for All My Friends. The sextet doesn't balk at his description, but the music has splintered in and out of that designation with every new album. On A Drink for All My Friends, My Education taps into its most triumphant, untethered set of compositions, even as the title and theme pay tribute to the departed.

My Education's education began in 1999, when guitarist Brian Purington, 36, migrated from San Angelo "with a group of people to start a band." Among those was singer Joe Covington.

"Eventually he quit, out of spite," explains Purington, alluding to a common theme in My Education's growth – membership turnover. "I have not spoken to him in the 10 years since he quit the band, but I know he's married with two kids living back in San Angelo now," he emails me later. "I decided to keep doing the band as an instrumental [project] because half the songs I had written were instrumental. At that point, Chris Hackstie [41, guitar] was already in the band, and James [Alexander] joined."

Behind this core trio, 2004 saw the release of debut 5 Popes, a substantial if similarsounding group of tracks Purington calls "more shoegaze influenced." 2005's Italian demonstrated growth, but My Education's first left-field release arrived with the following year's Moody Dipper, which boasted a wider palette of mood and style. Aside from three original numbers - or a pair and one interpretation, "Spirit of Peace (A Variation on a Theme by Popul Vuh)" - the band sounds unencumbered, though remixes by Kinski and Deadverse ground My Education in a habitat even darker and more distorted than the one they created originally. The album deals in extremes, and the addition of percussionist and master vibraphone player Sarah Norris pushes the sound skyward. 2008 marked the release of Bad Vibrations, after which the band continued expanding.

In 2010, My Education matched that darker evocation in a score it composed for the 1927 silent film *Sunrise: A Song of Two Humans*, directed by F. W. Murnau, the man behind 1922's seminal vampire scare-all *Nosferatu*. That summer, a happy accident – or at least roadworthy reality – resulted in a collaboration with Salt Lake City's Theta Naught as Sound Mass. For a June show at Kilby Court, not only was attendance poor, the evening ran late.

"Instead of just doing our individual sets, we were like, 'Let's play one together," recalls My Education multi-instrumentalist Henna Chou, 32. "And it was fun because people switched off. Their harp player would trade off on the keyboard with me, and it was really interesting how it worked out that time. It motivated us to try it again later."

An improvisational collaboration under the name Sound Mass came out in 2011.

The ease of recording that album was far from typical, admits My Education bassist Scott Telles, 50, who also heads veteran local psych lords ST 37.

"Our compositional process is very lengthy because usually people come in with only the most rudimentary of ideas," he says. "We all whip it, beat it, and torture it until it starts to sound like a My Education song. The songs that came out on this record we've been working on for two years, if not longer for some of them."

This process frustrates the faint of heart, and those who don't fit the band's mold eventually squeeze out of their membership.

"We're socialists," offers Purington with less irony than you might expect. "Ultimately, the band should be greater than the sum of its parts."

My Education has experienced much turnover in its time. There will be more. Our interview takes place at the home of a band friend who's throwing a party for departing drummer Vincent Durcan.

That brings us to *A Drink for All My Friends*, inscribed with the phrase: "Respect to everyone we've lost." While a theme of memoriam remains ever-present, that presence feels fluid, unforced.

"It wasn't until we put the songs together that we realized there was a theme there," reveals Telles

"It's interesting that the theme is present on multiple levels," Chou continues. "The old keyboardist plays [on the album]; the album is mastered by the old drummer; and with everyone that's left – they come to shows, they get on the list, we hang out together. They still have their influence and input in some ways.

"So, the title of the album pays respect to all of these people from the past, dead or alive."

"Respect to everyone we've lost" takes on further meaning with A  $Drink\ for\ All\ My$ 

Friends. In November 2009, drummer and graphic artist Jerry Fuchs – who played with the Juan MacLean and !!! – had finished a tour with Maserati when he was killed after falling down a broken elevator shaft. "Roboter-Höhlenbewohner," dedicated to Fuchs, begins with a relentless drum intro. Former keyboardist Kirk Laktas inspired the LP's title track (he guests on it as well), while "Black Box" takes the theme of loss to the broadest conclusion.

"This is the one song that was not written with someone/something in mind," says Purington. "It's a concept of writing a song around the black-box recordings of doomed airliners."

The found sounds on the track are those of actual black-box recordings from five separate airplane crashes in the Eighties. Thirty years removed, it's still a difficult listen. At least the album's "difficult" for all the right reasons. As a band, My Education has never sounded more cohesive. Is Austin and the greater national music community ready to embrace mortality-laden instrumental rock?

"I have no idea," shrugs Purington. "I will say, though, that I feel we're in a pretty good spot right now. But I don't know."

"I don't see us as fitting into current trends at all," continues Telles. "I ignore that kind of stuff. I've been playing in bands since 1979, so I've seen the roller coaster of trendiness and coolness."

Trends or not, the band successfully Kickstarted its way to Europe for a tour this spring, and there's talk about collaborating with Dallas writer/director/actor C.M. Talkington on scoring a documentary. Somewhat ironically, a band whose latest album muses on what's been lost – emotionally, physically – has the most to gain from the release.

"We've been working toward this point," says Telles. "This is our time." ■

#### My Education

#### A Drink for All My Friends (Haute Magie)

My Education has mastered cinematic expressionism. Whereas in 2010 the Austinites masterfully scored F.W. Murnau's 1927 silent classic Sunrise: A Song of Two Humans, sixth LP A Drink for All My Friends flips the script, providing its own sense of suspenseful grandeur. "A Drink for ..." sets the scene, Sarah Norris' vibraphone falling like raindrops atop a bed of strings, before "... All My Friends" starts its slow ascent, an elegiac march of heavy post-rock giving way to Chris Hackstie's pedal steel aurora and full-blown orchestration.



Think Dirty Three composing a screen adaptation of Pink Floyd's *Animals*. For 46 minutes, My Education doesn't so much crest as wade, moving with pulsing circularity, onward and upward, as in the bombastic German prog of "Roboter-Höhlenbewohner." It's sophisticated space rock, purposeful and carefully considered, as if written with the eventual laser show in mind. "Black Box" offers the remarkable exception, scrambling radio transmissions from pilots in an eerie descent into darkness. While not as conceptually complete as *Sunrise*, *A Drink for All My Friends* remains a significant feat, one certainly worth raising a glass to.

#### Foreign Mothers, the Dead Space, Horse + Donkey, Ghetto Ghouls, Feral Future Beerland, Jan. 3



Ninety minutes prior to the witching hour last Thursday, Austin registered a damp 45 degrees. Beerland only heated up - from the first act on to the fifth band off. Feral Future, initially atonal and amelodic in its proto-proggy post-punk, gained density and ferocity fast. "This is another song about not giving a fuck," noted the three-quarters female quartet's lead banshee Arielle Sonnenschein. That became the evening's theme. "We're Ghetto Ghouls," mumbled the following band's guitarist/ screamer. "Have fun. Go fuck yourselves." Clanging, banging, the trio came on like a Come On Pilgrim-era Pixies, erupting with said announcer's beer bottle slide ejaculation on "Living Alone." As the rhythm section rotated, his chainsaw/lawnmower riffs gnawed and gnashed. Seventeen minutes and they were done. Once one of the leading lights of the local scene, Horse + Donkey misses former trio leader

Jaime Zuverza, who helped populate the two-thirds-full Beerland, but with Ryan Camarillo leading Luis Martinez Jr. (drums) and Ollie Valdez (bass), the threesome's dark wave neo-surf still spikes waves of skittering pointillism. A personal discovery and thus Free Week's ultimate raison d'etre, the Dead Space took Horse + Donkey's aqua pulse and jolted it into a driving funnel of spook rock - dark, powerful, confident - like something English, Eighties. Foreign Mothers, also Gang of Four-ish, pounded out its 2012 LP, Duh, with no-frills femininity, at one point singing about being caught without a tampon. "Since that's what girl bands sing about," mocked guitarist/singer Kana Harris. (Bassist/co-vocalist Stephanie Mueller also helps hold down Feral Future.) Girl band, yes: moody, hacking, siren-esque. Wicked. At 2am, when they were done, the sleet began.

**Smoke & Feathers** 

Eagle Claw, Tia Carrera, Megafauna, Flesh Lights, Smoke & Feathers, My Education Red 7, Jan. 5

The microphone was mostly ornamental, but when Matt Rade of "instru-metal" locals Eagle Claw stepped up to it in between songs to praise a bill he described as "eclectic," he wasn't blowing smoke. Saturday night, Red 7's inside and outside stages came buttressed by power trios, flavors of punk, hard rock, and metal, all with an ensuring devotion to volume. The line outside the club snaked long and the weather blew cold, making it all that much easier to cozy up to other patrons for Tia Carrera's unspooling jams, more psych when Jason Morales took lead guitar, and cleaner when Jamey Simms switched off. The project remains anchored by Erik Conn, a drummer of preternatural skill. Another trio with a classically hard footprint is Megafauna, which reaches into a grab bag of progressive song skeletons over which guitarist Dani Neff shreds magnificently. Outside, the Flesh Lights pounded out a set of power punk so manic that steam rose off bassist Jeremy Steen. High, reedy vocals from Smoke & Feathers singer Josh Terry took their melted Southern rock into darker, less familiar territory, though it was Hunter Cahalan's turn at the mic and theremin that maximized eyeballs to the front of the room. At this point the crush of people hadn't subsided, and, outside, the aforementioned Eagle Claw pushed hard into 1am with a pounding set of new and old material, including the first track they wrote as a band, "Milk." Last up, My Education's woozy improvisation was a good come-down featuring Skye Ashbrook on a bouncespitting drum machine, equal parts Hot Boys and Mogwai eclectic all right. - Adam Schragin

#### Ume, the Calm Blue Sea, the Black & White Years, My Jerusalem Emo's East, Jan. 4

Two years since its inception, Modern Outsider has corralled an impressively eclectic roster of Austin talent, all on display for the local imprint's Free Week showcase. Emo's bowed to the dark bellows of non-Modern Outsiders My Jerusalem, fronted by Jeff Klein and airing out November's sophomore LP, Preachers, with a powerhouse set honed from touring with X. "Born in the Belly" surged with scathing riffs into the melodic "Mono," as Klein and his quartet controlled the stage with rock star aplomb, riding jagged bursts of "Sweet Chariot" into the crowd for closer "Sleepwalking." The Black & White Years lightened up the mood with jangled, synthesized pop, diving into its catalog on "Up!" and "Power to Change," while debuting a new tune from the locals' upcoming and long-awaited second album. The foursome still proved capable of surprising, with madcap quivers and turns on "To Modern Science" and the whistling "Two Reservoirs." Pummeling percussion into epic proportions, the Calm Blue Sea dislodged its post-rock with tensiontight builds from last year's Arrivals and Departures. The addition of deeply reverbed vocals served to accent their swirling instrumental climaxes without distracting, simultaneously hypnotic and jarring in release. As expected, Ume conquered the night, the trio erupting with a well-honed "The Conductor" as Lauren Larson flailed a vicious vision in white and wrestled her guitar across the stage. The lulling thrash of "Hurricane" and "Captive" crashed into the shredding wall from "Dancing Blind" and "Burst," cementing Ume, and Modern Outsider, at the top of Austin's rock pile. - Doug Freeman





#### Deep Space, the Boxing Lesson, Obscured by Echoes, Residual Kid Mohawk, Jan. 6

Free Week ended its first half in an acid haze at Mohawk, but first up sidled Residual Kid, a local power trio whose collective age hits 40. One wonders if the youngsters' penchant for noisy grunge pop reflects their parents' record collections rather than their own, but there's no denying their skill at mangling their instruments unself-consciously. Residual Kid means it, so crowd comments on the order of, "Oh, they're so adorable," seemed unfair. Despite a name with two Pink Floyd references and a Svd Barrett cover. Obscured by Echoes (formerly the Hi-Tones) had more in common with Eighties psych icons Rain Parade or Plasticland than the original Sixties inspirations. The melodramatic paisley underground pop of "Hatchet Man" and "Living Social" benefits from strong melodies, screwdriver-tight ensemble playing, and char-

ismatic point man Johnny Flores. It's florid and frankly fantastic. With Residual Kid's Ben Redman timekeeping, the Boxing Lesson sparked even brighter. Ignoring the cold emptiness of space for the busy bits that house comets, meteor showers, and supernovas, the Austin trio's cosmic synths, rocket rhythms, and planet-fall riffing produced an acid star bright enough to be seen across galaxies. Previewing songs from the Chris "Frenchie" Smith-produced LP Big Hits, the Boxing Lesson set the silver machine for the heart of the sun. Fresh quintet Deep Space closed with an earthy psych sound more in the realm of hometown heroes the Black Angels. The band doesn't really have the songcraft yet, but leader Robbie D. Love's full-body axe-wielding generates enough excitement to justify waiting until it does. - Michael Toland

In October, Austrian artist Alexander Riegler installed a one-way mirror in the ladies' room at a cafe in Vienna to allow men's room users to peer inside (in the name of "art," of course). #### FRAGRANCE OF WAR

Updating "The Smell of Napalm in the Morning": A cosmetics company in Gaza recently began selling a fragrance dedicated to victory over Israel and named after the signature M-75 missile that Hamas has been firing across the border. "The fragrance is pleasant and attractive," said the company owner, "like the missiles of the Palestinian resistance," and comes in masculine and feminine varieties, at premium prices (over, presumably, the prices of ordinary Gazan fragrances). Sympathizers can splash on victory, he said, from anywhere in the world.

#### **GOVERNMENT IN ACTION**

The Philadelphia Traffic Court has been so infused with ticket-fixing since its founding in 1938 that a recent Pennsylvania Supreme Court report on the practice seemed resigned to it, according to a November Philadelphia Inquirer account. One court employee was quoted as defending the favoritism as fair (as long as no money changed hands) on the grounds that anyone could get local politicians to call a judge for him. Thus, said the employee, "It was the [traffic] violator's own fault if he or she didn't know enough" to get help from a political connection. Traffic Judge Christine Solomon, elected in November 2011 after a career as a favor-dispensing "ward healer," said the ticket-fixing was "just politics, that's all."

More than 200 school districts in California have covered current expenses with "capital appreciation bonds," which allow borrowers to forgo payments for years – but at some point require enormous balloon payments. A Los Angeles Times investigation revealed that dis-

tricts have borrowed about \$3 billion and thus are on the hook for more than \$16 billion. "It's the school district equivalent of a payday loan," said California State Treasurer Bill Lockyer, a former school board member who said he'd fire anyone who sought such loans. (Some defenders of the loans pointed to schools' occasional need for immediate money so they could qualify for federal matching grants – which, to the districts, would be "free" money.)

One of the principal recommendations following the Sept. 11 attacks was that emergency and rescue personnel have one secure radio frequency on which all agencies that were merged into the Department of Homeland Security could communicate. In November, the department's inspector general revealed that, despite \$430 million allotted to build and operate the frequency in the last nine years, it remains almost useless to DHS' 123,000 employees. The report surveyed 479 workers, but found only one who knew how to find the frequency, and 72% did not even know one existed (and half the department's radios couldn't have accessed it even if employees knew where to look).

Remember Alaska's "Bridge to Nowhere"?: In November, the *Anchorage Daily News* reported the Army Corps of Engineers is building a harbor on the Aleutian native community's island of Akutan, even though there is no road away from it. Thus, reported KUCB Radio, the only way to get into or out of the harbor is by boat. Any connector road to the only town on the island is "likely years in the future," according to the *Daily News*. As well, there is no assurance that the largest business in the area, Trident Seafoods, would ever use the harbor.

#### **POLICE REPORT**

Anthony Johnson, 49, was convicted in October in Hartford, Conn., of stealing an improbably large amount of money – as much as \$70,000 a weekend, off and on for five years – by crawling on the floor of darkened theatres and lifting credit cards from purses that movie-watching women had set down. The FBI said Johnson was careful to pick films likely to engross female viewers so that he could operate freely. He was often able to finish up, leave the theatre, and make cashadvance withdrawals from ATMs before the movie had ended.

Things That Almost Never Happen: In October, a 34-year-old man being detained by Port St. Lucie, Fla., police on an indecent-exposure complaint convinced the officer to free him based on showing the officer his testicles. (A woman had complained that the man was masturbating in public, but the man apparently demonstrated an impressively severe rash that he said he could not avoid scratching.)

Niles Gammons of Urbana, Ohio, apparently did some partying on Saturday night, Nov. 3, because he managed a rare DUI daily double. He was first cited for DUI at 1:08am Sunday and then, 60 minutes later, he was again cited for DUI at 1:08am. (The first was during daylight saving time; the second was after the changeover.)

#### **PERSPECTIVE**

Human rights activists have for years deplored the preferences for male offspring in India and other nations - ranging from cultures that marginalize female babies to some that practice discreet infanticide of girls. Increasingly, though, because of "advances" in science, Westerners can buy expensive in vitro fertilization procedures that use a laser to breach a fertilized embryo to determine whether it contains XY chromosome pairs (i.e., males) or larger XX ones so that only the desired-gender embryos are chosen. Noted Slate.com in September, such procedures are illegal in Canada, Australia, and the United Kingdom (except for bona fide medical reasons), but legal in the United States.

This, the 1,300th edition of "News of the Weird," marks birthday No. 25. So, what was happening in 1988 in that first batch of stories published by that first adventurous editor? **Austin Zoo and Animal Sanctuary** on the southwestern outskirts of Austin has given 350 life-or-death stories happy endings. All of the residents have a story of how they were rescued by the sanctuary.

Opened in 1994, the zoo has survived its own growing pains over the years, but one thing that has never wavered is the commitment to the animals, says Patti Clark, the zoo's executive director and board president of the nonprofit organization that oversees the operation.

The 350 residents range from farm animals to big cats, birds to reptiles, and laboratory experiments to family pets. The zoo is their retirement home.

Babe is a Yorkshire pig nearly as large as a small car. He was a 4-H project, but when it came time to auction him to the slaughterhouse, the owner just couldn't do it. She and her mother helped pay for Babe's retirement, and they visit him often.

Jason is a red kangaroo who was living with two dogs in San Angelo when it was

discovered that the city had an ordinance specifically against the ownership of marsupials. "They told us it was a wallaby," Patti says. He turned out to be one of the largest species of kangaroos and is now a favorite of visitors.

# Zero Dark Thirty

#### Much as they did in their 2008 collaboration The Hurt Locker, director Kathryn Bigelow and twotime screenwriter Mark Boal eye the line where

suspense resides and push straight through to stress, to agitation. As a cinematic experience, Zero Dark Thirty can be downright punishing - a word not chosen lightly, given that U.S.-sanctioned torture figures prominently here and has been courting controversy since even before the film's release. Some critics have wagged that Zero Dark Thirty is pro-torture, while other government officials have complained that the film

oversells the efficacy of the enhanced interrogation techniques that for many came to define the Bush era. But dramatization of a thing is not the same as an endorsement of it, and Bigelow and Boal make it plain that the intelligence extracted via torture was compromised at best and, frequently, flat wrong. But you don't tell this story - of the CIA's decade-long manhunt for Osama bin Laden - without including torture, and pussyfooting around that would have only roused the ire of a different set of critics.

Bigelow is not a kid-glove kind of filmmaker. She opens with a stark black screen and audio of real-life voicemails left by 9/11 victims just moments before the World Trade Center collapsed. It's a measure of the seriousness of her intentions that this opening gambit doesn't feel instantly exploitative. The audio runs as a precursor to an extended torture scene, led by a scary, charismatic operative named Dan (Clarke), who calls his prisoner (Kateb) "bro." The proximity between these scenes could be misread as an apologia. I think it's just context: The jihadis aren't the only ones who believe they are fighting a holy war.

CIA analyst Maya (Chastain, riveting) is a new recruit to that war. You can chart her evolution from that first torture scene, in

> which she is a smart-suited observer and green around the gills, to several years into her tenure in Pakistan, where she now leads the interrogation and taps a strong-arm to do the punching for her. The blood runs cold at that casual tap, but the filmmakers don't underscore the moment with a close-up, don't chew it over with any psychoanalytic monologuing. This isn't that kind of movie. It's a mistake to confuse Zero Dark Thirty for "truth" - that would be a disservice to the high level of craftsmanship, from firstbilled actors to below-the-line

production crew, at work in this movie fiction - but there is admirably little fat on its bones. No love interests, no backstories, no B-plot about Maya's childhood: Zero Dark Thirty is as ruthlessly, relentlessly single-minded as she is about the hunt for bin Laden.

#### NEW REVIEWS

#### **GANGSTER SQUAD**

D: Ruben Fleischer; with Sean Penn, Josh Brolin, Ryan Gosling, Emma Stone, Nick Nolte, Robert Patrick, Michael Peña, Giovanni Ribisi, Anthony Mackie, Austin Highsmith. (R, 110 min.)

A virtual catalog of uneven filmmaking, which includes the plot and many of the performances, Gangster Squad tells the story of a number of cops who band together to work outside the law. New Los Angeles Police Chief Parker (Nolte) is installed in 1950 to clean up the department and deal with the East Coast mobs that are working to establish bases of operations in L.A. According to this film, the worst of these gangsters is Mickey Cohen (Penn). Unofficially, Sgt. John O'Mara (Brolin) is asked by Parker to create a renegade band of honest cops to go after Cohen and his mob.

O'Mara recruits a cross section of familiar stereotypes. The wise-cracking Sgt. Jerry Wooters (Gosling) is O'Mara's sidekick and foil. Officer Coleman Harris (Mackie) is the streetwise, knife-wielding African-American of the group. The legendary sharpshooter and old-timer Max Kennard (Patrick) brings along his young Hispanic protégé Navidad Ramirez (Peña), while Officer Conway Keeler (Ribisi) is a technical and communications genius.

Loosely based on historical incidents and characters, the film takes great liberties with them. Mickey Cohen, in particular, is lionized past all historical record with one of his major criminal accomplishments in Las Vegas transferred for the sake of this story to L.A. Much of the historical turf has also been cannibalized in such TV series as The Hat Squad and such films as the confusing Mulholland Falls and L.A. Confidential, to name a few of the creative projects that deal with how a handful of honest cops work outside the corrupt L.A. police system as they try to prevent the East Coast mob from gaining a significant presence in their city.

After more than 100 years of gangster films, it's become hard to offer an original and unique effort in this genre. What is notable about Gangster Squad is its uncomfortable mingling of brutal and fun elements; it's like a strange mutant offspring of The Untouchables and a pulp comic-book sensibility. Nonstop, over-the-top violence is set against the classic backdrop of grand hotels, train station lobbies, and Hollywood nightclubs. (Gangster Squad's original scene of gunplay in Grauman's Chinese Theatre was excised and restaged following the Aurora movie theatre rampage, which pushed back the film's release date.)

Penn's performance is consistently over-thetop and viciously stylized; it sometimes seems right on target and at other times seems jarringly out of place. Brolin's performance, on the other hand, is consistent throughout - deadly serious and straight-ahead - but even this approach delivers erratic results. The other members of the squad are undeveloped as characters and are used primarily as stereotypes. The best performance in the film is Gosling's as Sgt. Jerry Wooters: It's deliberately uneven, and almost always proves to be exactly what is needed. One is not sure for quite a while who Wooters really is - what drives him and what he believes in - which deepens the film and adds some humorous

touches and nonviolent personal exchanges. His relationship with Cohen's girlfriend Grace Faraday (Stone) is largely predictable but includes some unexpected moments and interesting interactions.

Director Ruben Fleischer (Zombieland, 30 Minutes or Less) delivers no cinematic surprises other than his unevenness of tone, style, and narrative development. Despite the unrelenting action and the terrific cast, Gangster Squad comes up more scattered than successful.

#### **TEXAS CHAINSAW**

Of all the remakes, reboots, and sequels of The Texas Chain Saw Massacre, which was first made in 1974, this new film is the one that picks up right where the original films ends. However, even though the legend of the cannibalistic Sawyer clan still grabs our attention, this new film survives on its formulaic horror mechanics and the powerful image of a chain saw wielded in 3-D.

The new film opens with the closing scene of the original, showing the lone massacre survivor making her final getaway in the back of a pickup truck. Now we get to see what came next: An angry mob of townsfolk defy the local sheriff and burn down the Sawyer farmhouse, presumably killing the cannibalistic clan. But a baby girl survives, and a married mob couple scoop up the child and raise her as their own. Twenty years later (never mind that the actual math works out to nearly 40 years later) the girl, Heather (Daddario) is living in another town and working in a supermarket meat department. Unaware that she is adopted, she receives a letter informing her that she has inherited a house in Texas from a grandmother she never knew she had. Off she heads in a VW van with her boyfriend (R&B artist Trey Songz) and another couple, as well as a hitchhiker they pick up along the way, FILM LISTINGS

to scope out her new acquisition. Her companions never register as more than cannon fodder, and these nincompoops, of course, go into the basement and unlock what's hidden behind a heavy, metal door. It turns out that Leatherface (Yeager) also survived the fire.

Much running around in the cemetery and woods that abut the house ensues. Leatherface lopes along with his chain saw and is nicely backlit for that haunting effect. Daddario wears a midriff-bearing top throughout the first half of the movie and then a shirt that won't stay buttoned shut during the second half, while her pal Nikki (Raymonde) wears short-shorts that she's quick to take off. The twist in Texas Chainsaw is revealing the hideous mob mentality of the townspeople, who are vicious in their desire to rid themselves of Leatherface. So ruthless and hateful are the townsfolk that Heather comes to sympathize with her cousin Leatherface - despite the fact that he killed her four companions and sews human skin onto his face. It's a large psychological leap that's, shall we say, hard to swallow. However, stick around through the credits for an extra closing scene that leaves the door of Heather's new home wide open for a sequel. – Marjorie Baumgarten Alamo Slaughter Lane, Barton Creek Square,

#### **ANNA KARENINA**

In this bold but empty imagining of Anna Karenina, director Joe Wright sets the action mostly within the walls of a theatre: This world is, quite literally, all a stage. There is the sedate wife and mother Anna (Knightley), limply married to the fly-right bureaucrat Karenin (Law) and embarking for Moscow to save her brother's marriage to poor, put-upon Dolly (Macdonald). And there is the first acquaintance of doomed Anna and Count Vronsky (Taylor-Johnson), who tumble into an erotic liaison that will both ignite and ruin her. There is so much to compact here, and – forgive the schoolmarm aside – if you haven't yet enjoyed the source novel, then you should stop reading this right now and start reading that, because it truly is a transformative thing. Sadly, the complexity of Tolstoy's vision is only just skimmed here; this Anna Karenina provides no lasting illumination, only the fast-burn spitzing of bang snaps. (11/30/2012) Kimberley Jones

#### ARGO

Ben Affleck has reinvented himself as one of Hollywood's top-notch directors, and this third feature fully proves that the filmmaker knows what he is doing. Argo is a terrifically entertaining thriller that's based on a true-life incident. Latino CIA operative Tony Mendez (Affleck) has been called in to help six American embassy employees who managed to escape when their compound in Iran was taken over by Islamic fundamentalists on Nov. 4, 1979. As the CIA contemplates extraction, Mendez hatches a crazy plan: creating the cover of a location-scouting expedition for a science fiction movie called Argo. As we follow every step of the mission, Affleck's deft craftsmanship and casting instincts are on full display. Not allowing well enough to be, however, is the multiple-pronged coda, which slackens Argo's taut pace to a crawl. But I can hear the filmmakers saying, in the cadence of the film's running joke, "Arrhh, go fuck yourself." (10/12/2012)

#### **CIROUE DU SOLEIL: WORLDS AWAY**

To call Cirque du Soleil mere circus is to undersell the astonishing breadth and vision of the Canadian troupe-turned-entertainment empire. And to call Cirque du Soleil: Worlds Away a movie - while technically accurate – is a wet willy to all those other movies out there toiling away at narrative logic, dramatic stakes, and identifiable characters. This 3-D film offers up a kind of pupu platter of seven Cirque du Soleil shows, strung together with the very thin connective tissue of an original story, penned by writer/director Andrew Adamson. In the framing story, a circusgoer (Linz) falls in love with an aerialist (Zaripov) and chases him into a beautifully rendered but bizarro land of dizzying, gosh-wow acrobatics and thrilling design. Unfortunately, the leads are dull as dishwater, and, minute-to-minute, the damn thing doesn't make any sense. Cirque du Soleil: Worlds Away is fine to look at. but good luck feeling anything. #### CLOUD ATLAS

This remarkable adaptation of David Mitchell's supposedly "unfilmable" novel achieves near-perfection on virtually all levels. What at first seems an ultraconvoluted series of interconnected story lines - six of them, with actors playing multiples roles over multiple centuries - quickly transforms into a film of astonishing depth and insight. But, "What's it about?" The answer, in brief, is "the interconnected nature of life. Cloud Atlas is ambitious and complex beyond measure, but Tykwer and the Wachowskis pull it off with compassion, cliff-hanging storytelling, and a deeply empathetic moral center. Evil is all over the place in this film, but it ends on a thrilling, majestic note of hope, with directors, cast, and crew all coming together to create a singular whole that makes perfect sense in the end. Cloud Atlas is an utterly spellbinding film about the triumph of the human spirit across centuries and over the darkest of odds. (10/26/2012) - Marc Savlov



#### O DJANGO UNCHAINED

Quentin Tarantino is back with another whip-smart wish-fulfillment history adventure. Django Unchained has obvious roots in the spaghetti Western, yet it's also a love story, a revenge picture, and an action comedy. The love story, in which the former slave Django (Foxx) seeks to rescue his wife Broomhilda (Washington) from the plantation owner to whom she was sold, is vivid and palpable. The revenge drama is violent and bloody, with whippings and near-castration added to Tarantino's vast arsenal of sanguinary mayhem. Even the comedy has its moments to shine. As entertaining and eye-opening as Django Unchained is, the film also suffers from a certain slackness. Toward the end of the two-hour-and-45-minute epic, the film seems ready to conclude - but not before Tarantino stages another obligatory, Mexican-standoff flourish. Despite these quibbles, Django Unchained, with its embarrassment of riches (and tiny cameos), was one Christmas present we couldn't wait to unwrap. (12/28/2012)

Screenwriter/Director David Ayer (Training Day, Dark Blue, Street Kings) has mastered the minutiae of the Los Angeles cop-movie subgenre better than anyone else I can think of. End of Watch might have been yet another buddy-cop flick but for the obvious camaraderie between LAPD partners Zavala (Peña), who is married with kids, and Taylor (Gyllenhaal), a high-strung Marine fresh from Afghanistan. Ayer introduces us into their daily grind just after they've been tossed into the slipstream of violence and thuggery that is Southeast L.A. following the shooting of a suspect. On the streets, Taylor videotapes cop life in a haltingly cinema verité style. (He's taking a filmmaking class and this is his project.) Interestingly, a group of hyperviolent gangbangers is wantonly running amok with their own cameras rolling. Eventually, the two sides, law and lawlessness, collide, and this being an Ayer film, the result isn't pretty, but it is wholly believable. (09/21/2012)

For the first half-hour, Flight keeps us rapt with thrilling action and a troubling moral quandary. But once things become more earthbound, the film reshapes itself into a standard substance-abuse story. A copious line of coke gets airline pilot Whip Whitaker (Washington) out the door and on the way to the airport. Suddenly, all your worst fears about pilots unfit to fly are staring you in the face. Yet, when his plane experiences massive mechanical failure, Whip manages to land via crazy, instinctive measures. He is indeed a hero, but he also had a .24 blood-alcohol level during the crash. Reconciling those facts is an interesting dilemma, and one that fuels the ensuing investigation. Director Zemeckis shows he still has a vivid visual sensibility and a finger on the zeitgeist. But Flight's pat closing sequence leaves nothing up in the air and returns all tray tables to their full, upright positions. (11/02/2012)



# THE HOBBIT: AN UNEXPECTED JOURNEY

All aboard: The Middle-earth Express has once more pulled into the station. Though this initial offering in the planned trilogy of J.R.R. Tolkien's 1937 fantasy novel feels regrettably slight in terms of narrative adventure and fantasy revelations, that hasn't prevented director Peter Jackson from painting Middle-earth with abundant visual detail and technical bravura. The Hobbit introduces us to a few new creatures - trolls, the dragon Smaug - and old ones, too - Gollum (Serkis) reappears, creepy and deranged as ever – but the hobbit Bilbo Baggins (Freeman), the wizard Gandalf (McKellen), and an indistinguishable clump of 13 good-natured, hairyheaded dwarves are the primary protagonists here. To sum it up, there is little that is unexpected in The Hobbit: An Unexpected Journey. Rather than an epic continuation of Jackson's Middle-earth obsession, the film seems more like the work of a man driving around a multilevel parking garage, unable to find the exit. (12/14/2012)

Throwing a bunch of Universal classic monster archetypes into an animated film and then using a generic coming-of-age, father-daughter relationship as the linchpin might've seemed like a good idea on paper, but onscreen Tartakovsky's Hotel Transylvania is as generically vacant as Mrs. Bates' eye sockets. The 118th birthday of Dracula's daughter, Mavis (voiced by Gomez), has finally arrived and the overprotective Drac (Sandler), now the manager of the "for monsters only" Hotel Transylvania, wants to keep her under his wing forever. But, when Jonathan (Samberg), a lost human backpacker, stumbles stonily into the hotel, love passes between the vampire's daughter and the displaced skater dude, much to Drac's chagrin. Not a whole lot ensues that you haven't already figured out on your own. Universal should sue for damages to the reputation of its classic movie monsters. As for Hotel Transylvania,, no need to put a stake in it - it's deadly dull already. (09/28/2012)

#### **HYDE PARK ON HUDSON**

These days, most revelations of sexual infidelities and dalliances engaged in by our political leaders have lost their power to shock or even surprise us. Yet, there's something indecorous about this glimpse of Franklin Delano Roosevelt as a philanderer who carried on multiple and simultaneous affairs with women other than his wife Eleanor. Hyde Park on Hudson is based on the letters found underneath the bed of Margaret "Daisy" Suckley – FDR's sixth cousin - after her death. The letters revealed the affair she had with the president, which she had kept secret all those years. Screenwriter Richard Nelson casts this sexual disclosure against the backdrop of an event of greater historic significance: a weekend visit from the British royals in 1939. Linney's performance as Daisy lacks definition and personality, and the omniscience of her voiceover narration rings false. What remains is the stunt casting of Bill Murray, which works so much better than it has any right to. (12/21/2012) - Marjorie Baumgarten

#### **THE IMPOSSIBLE**

You don't have to be a parent to feel this film in your bones. The Impossible, Juan Antonio Bayona's dramatization of the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, begins when a British family - Henry (McGregor), Maria (Watts), and their three young sons - travel to a resort in Thailand for Christmas. Based on a true story, but dressed with the usual cinematic embellishments, The Impossible tracks what happens two days later, when a 30-foot wall of water rends the family apart. It's a mess-maker, this movie. The Impossible harrows like no other film in recent memory, from its visceral depiction of the natural disaster to an intensely emotional landscape of lost children and boundless kindnesses done by strangers. Still, there are missteps. The material is so innately powerful and potently portrayed - that it needles when Bayona gilds the lily with forehead-slapping missed connections and heart strings overplucked (see: usual cinematic embellishments). #### **JACK REACHER**

Although I've only read one of Lee Child's Jack Reacher novels, my expectations for this film were very low for the same reason many fans of the series have disparaged it: Cruise lacks the inherent violence and visceral menace (as well as the oversized stature) of Child's Reacher. I was thus quite

surprised by how well this violent suspense thriller works. Jack Reacher opens as five civilians are shot dead in a city mall. Barr (Sikora), the seeming culprit, is soon arrested, but on the pad provided for his confession, he instead writes: "Get Jack Reacher." After arriving in the city, Reacher gradually comes to suspect that Barr may have been set up, and begins to work on the case with Helen (Pike), Barr's defense attorney. Often dark and, at times, quite brutal, writer/director Christopher McQuarrie's Jack Reacher is occasionally predictable and slowmoving, but mostly the film is very suspenseful, enthralling stuff. The quality-assurance boast of monster-hit stage musical Les Misérables (based on Victor Hugo's 1862 novel) might as well be "Successfully Wringing Tears Since 1985!" A lot of hysteria attends director Tom Hooper's extravagant adaptation ... and I loved it. Jackman is commanding as the former convict Jean Valiean, who hides his past to become a devoted factory owner. Soon, the closing-in of his onetime jailer, Inspector Javert (Crowe), forces a spiritual crisis and another flight from the law. When Les Misérables is good, it is very, very good, and when it is bad, it's usually because Russell Crowe has opened his mouth. Shot to shot, Hooper's vision careens between grotesque hyperrealism and tinny movie artifice. It is a little pitchy, this seesaw between grit and gloss, but it's those wobbles in performance, the so-called mistakes, that make Les Misérables human and heartfelt and - ultimately - a potent piece of cinema. Demonstrating a delicate mastery of 3-D, Ang Lee has made a movie that had me in its visual thrall even before the opening credits were through. Soon, however, the magical spell lifts and the film clunks toward Earth as a man nicknamed Pi (Irrfan Khan) promises to tell a character called the Writer (Rafe Spall) a story that will make him "believe in God." Setting aside the story's fuzzy theological concerns, Life of Pi, which is adapted from Yann Martel's bestselling novel, is extraordinarily accomplished. The story is gripping, and when adrift with teenage Pi (Suraj Sharma) and the Bengal tiger on the open sea, the film is at its most wondrous: a ravishing spectacle that treads judiciously on the infinite line between what's possible and impossible. Life of Pi, ironically, soars when it confines itself to land and sea; when it grasps for the celestial, the film goes beyond its reach. (11/23/2012)

While Chase's story – about a garage band that hardly makes it out of the driveway – has its pleasures, they are scattered and unsustained. Douglas Damiano (Magaro), essentially a callow young man, is the drummer in the band, although he soon switches to frontman and catches the eye of a girl, Grace (Heathcote). His aspiration for a career in music exacerbates the rift between him and his father (Gandolfini, delivering a superlative performance). #### PROMISED LAND

Steve just about has things sewn up when an environmentalist named Dustin Noble

(Krasinski) shows up and proceeds to work the community - and Steve - into a froth. Dustin also vies for the affections of Alice (DeWitt), the local woman who has caught Steve's eye. Until a big, third-act revelation, not much else happens here. Promised Land doesn't offer great drama, nor does it offer the great debate on fracking that some might have hoped for. Movie remakes are rarely a good idea (at least from an artistic point of view). The original Red Dawn, John Milius' 1984 cult classic about Midwestern teenagers who defiantly defend their homeland against Russian invasion, has become deeply entrenched in the American soul. The 2012 remake, however, derives most of its inspiration from Call of Duty and other first-person-shooter video games, rather than the original film. Although the invading forces are North Korean this time around, the remake hews pretty close to the original in terms of the plot. But Bradley's version places all the emphasis on the action sequences and is near-laughable during its dramatic lulls. Aside from some thin threads about missing girlfriends and such, the dynamic between Chris Hemsworth's Marine-on-leave and his vounger brother (Josh Peck) is the remake's only dramatic arc. #### **RISE OF THE GUARDIANS**

Kids who can stomach mixed holiday fare should be able to ride out this stereoscopic superstorm of snow globes, Easter eggs, magic portals, enchanted crystals, moon worship, fruitcakes, matryoshka dolls, and lost teeth. Others may be confused. Despite the Thanksgiving-week release, Rise of the Guardians is not quite a Christmas movie. It's like a public-domain version of Cartoon All-Stars to the Rescue: Santa (voiced by Baldwin), the Easter Bunny (Jackman), the Tooth Fairy (Fisher), and the Sandman (a mute) team up with Jack Frost (Pine) to defeat the Boogeyman, aka Pitch (Law), who is threatening to enshroud the world in fear and darkness. Adapted from author and illustrator William Joyce's The Guardians of Childhood book series, Rise of the Guardians displays little evidence of Joyce's acclaimed artistic hand; the visual style of this DreamWorks film, directed by Peter Ramsey with visual consulting by Roger Deakins, is retro in the worst way. #### SILVER LININGS PLAYBOOK

The smartest solution may lie in some balance between the two, and Silver Linings Playbook similarly rides the center line in its empathetic but facile look at mental illness. When Pat meets Tiffany (Lawrence), a young widow raw with grief, a tentative friendship forms, and Pat's days gain new purpose and direction. Writer/director David O. Russell, adapting Matthew Quick's novel, is in his element here: Silver Linings Playbook is consistently funny and very sweet fun. Glocks in their meaty paws. When the thugs kidnap Kim and Lenore, Bryan goes into invincible MacGyver mode and much running and leaping across the rooftops of Istanbul follows. The action is frenetic and frequent, and the whole film has a vaguely Eurotrash vibe. It's fun enough on its own relatively low-budget merits, but it's really nothing to die – or kill – for. "We have to choose to be happy," says wife and mom Debbie (Mann), who has whorled herself into an existential tizzy after turning 40. Is happiness a choice? It's an idea worth exploring, but writer/director Judd Apatow isn't exactly laserlike in his focus; he's more like a dog licking the entire kitchen floor just to find that one tile smudged with bacon grease. Debbie and husband Pete (Rudd) - supporting characters from 2007's Knocked Up - are moving reluctantly toward middle age. They absolutely seethe with resentment while dealing with bickering daughters; emotionally distant, financially dependent fathers; and missed mortgage payments. I wonder if Apatow meant it all to come off so bleakly? At its desperate and raw, clogged-artery core, This Is 40 is a powerful evocation of family life as war zone. The plot kicks in when Bella and Edward's new progeny Renesmee - half-vamp, half-human - is spied by another vampire, who runs to tattle to the Volturi (the undead tribunal) that the Cullens bit a kid - a capital offense. Sanitized bloodlust, decapitated heads, and mixed messages swathed in a soft-focus shimmer ensue. If a late-in-the-film montage of Bella and Edward's swooniest looks seems familiar, that's because you've seen the same supercut on YouTube already, spliced together by a small army of sighing girls. #### CALCULATING CHILD SUPPORT

I've never received child support but could really use it. I'm trying to figure out if it would be worth the hassle to tru to get it from mu child's father. How can I figure out how much I might receive in child support?

Assuming you and the father are unable to reach an agreement on child support, a court would hear the case and decide how much child support should be paid. Texas has created guidelines to be used by courts when calculating the amount a noncustodial parent (i.e., the parent that does not have primary custody) should pay for child support. The guidelines work on a sliding scale, depending on the number of children that the noncustodial parent needs to support.

Under Texas law, if the noncustodial parent's net monthly income is not greater than \$7500, the amount paid for child support would be the following percentage of monthly income:

20% for one child

25% for two children

30% for three children

35% for four children 40% for five children

not less than 40% for six (or more) children

So, as an example, if the noncustodial parent has a monthly net income of \$4,000 and has two children to support, the amount of monthly child support owed would be \$1,000. Keep in mind that some special rules may apply in cases of split or joint placement, or multiple children in different households.

In addition, courts will base child support on the father's earning potential if the father is not making as much money as he could. So if the father were an investment banker who decided to quit and take a job that paid only a fraction of his banker's salary, the court would use the income that he could potentially earn (the banker's salary) to determine the adequate amount of monthly child support payments.
