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
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## Postmarks





## Broken Record

#### Latest APD shooting follows a too-familiar pattern

Here we go again.

I'm trying hard not to jump to conclusions about last Friday's police shooting of an unarmed man in unclear circumstances but it's not an easy task. The officer in question – Detective Charles Kleinert – has yet to give his official statement to

department investigators (as of press time on Wednesday), although he reportedly provided a description of the incident to supervisors immediately following the shooting. The victim, the late Larry Jackson Jr., will never be able to give his version of what happened, although there is certain mute testimony in the disclosure by the Austin Police Department that no weapon was found on Jackson's body.

It is also difficult to avoid the presumption that at least one of Jackson's "crimes" was that he was guilty of being black.

What we do know, from the APD's preliminary statements and some enterprising

reporting - notably by our own Jordan Smith - is that for some reason Jackson fled a conversation with Kleinert, and for some reason Kleinert took off after him even though Kleinert was in the middle of an investigation of something else, and even though Jackson (apparently holding

a false ID) had not succeeded even in entering the closed bank building where Kleinert was working.

Not only did Kleinert pursue Jackson on foot, he commandeered a private vehicle and its driver to search for Jackson through the neighborhood. The driver reportedly told police that Kleinert was highly agitated, did not clearly identify himself, and leapt from the

car to pursue Jackson, who by this time was calmly walking away. Jackson was shot in the ensuing struggle. Since the APD prefers to keep silent while an investigation is in progress (understandable to a degree), it appears the only reason we know that much is that Smith inquired whether a private car was involved in the chase, and APD spokespeople had to confirm it.

According to APD, investigators don't yet know if Kleinert fired his weapon intentionally or accidentally, and it will be 45 to 60 days before we know much more about the details. But it is difficult to avoid the conclusion that Jackson was effectively executed - shot in the back of the neck - for carrying a false ID.

#### Joining a List

As Smith points out in her story today ("More Questions Than Answers in APD Shooting," p.12), in pursuing Jackson alone and on foot, Kleinert was apparently violating departmental policy. And in commandeering a private vehicle and accosting Jackson without available backup, Kleinert was apparently acting with great carelesscontinued on p.10

#### Headlines

- > How can we miss you if you won't go away? The second special session of the 83rd Legislature ended July 30 with no agreement on transportation funding. Gov. Rick Perry immediately called another special, even though lawmakers warned him no deal is imminent (see Lege Lines, p.14.)
- > No City Council meeting this week, but on August 1 the budget cycle resumes in earnest, with the formal presentation of the proposed budget by City Manager Marc Ott and the budget staff. See "Budget Stretch Run," p.18.
- > City labor negotiations with the Austin Firefighters Association collapsed last week as the two sides could not agree on a new hiring procedure - city negotiators declared an impasse, and if no agreement can be reached by Oct. 1. standard civil service rules would apply.
- **Austin Independent School District** will finally break ground on its long-awaited **Performing** Arts Center at the Mueller development on Aug. 6. The 1,200-seat auditorium will be paid for with \$30 million in voter-approved bonds.
- > People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals this week announced that it was giving the Compassionate Fire Department Award to the Austin Fire Dept. for the heroic efforts of firefighters who went above and beyond to rescue a dog from an East Austin blaze. PETA says firefighter David Dickerson pulled the dog, Layla, to safety and used a special oxygen mask to revive her. Layla is expected to make a full recovery.
- Austin Police on July 25 charged 26-year-old Matthew Bacon with the murder of 36-year-old David Villarreal. Bacon allegedly told police he'd been wanting to kill someone for a while when he met Villarreal at Rain, a bar on West Fourth. He went home with Villarreal and bludgeoned him with a hammer, then slit his throat, before stealing electronics from the condo and fleeing to Louisiana, where he was picked up trying to sell drugs in a truck stop.
- A police motorcade snaked from Lakeway to Pflugerville where the Lakeway Police Department buried one of its own Monday afternoon. Sgt. Chris Doles was killed in a car accident Thursday morning on RR 620 south of Anderson Mill Road. The Lakeway Police Foundation has set up a fund to help Doles' family. Donations can be dropped off at the Lakeway PD or at Prosperity Bank, 1415 RR 620 South.
- > Planned Parenthood Gulf Coast last week agreed to pay \$1.4 million to end a Medicaid fraud inquiry by Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott's office. The AG's investigators said that PPGC billed for services it did not render: PPGC denies all wrongdoing.
- > On July 30, Army whistleblower Bradley Manning, who released hundreds of confidential military documents to online publisher WikiLeaks exposing military brutality and diplomatic corruption - was convicted on several charges of espionage but acquitted of "aiding the enemy," which could have meant a life-without-parole sentence. Manning could still be sentenced to decades of incarceration.

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

ness, putting himself, the driver, and ultimately Jackson at great risk, all of which was confirmed by the deadly outcome of the incident. If Kleinert truly thought Jackson sufficiently dangerous that he had to be apprehended immediately - and nothing in the little we have learned about Jackson thus far gives any indication that that was true - it seems even less rational that Kleinert ran after him alone and failed to give sufficient notice to other officers who might have joined the pursuit and lessened the risk.

All in all, the incident bears painful resemblance to the fatal shootings of Jessie Lee Owens Jr. (2003), Daniel Rocha (2005), Kevin Brown (2007), Nathaniel Sanders II (2009), and Byron Carter (2011). In each of these incidents (all reported in detail in the Chronicle), young men were shot and killed by police officers in stressful and confusing circumstances. And in each of these five incidents, it's a reasonable interpretation that an officer panicked, used his or her firearm when it wasn't necessary, and unnecessarily ended a life.

In only two of those shootings - Rocha and Brown - were the offending officers eventually dismissed from the force.

#### **Deeper Questions**

All five of those victims were black or brown. Jackson, once again, was African-American, and though no one is alleging any racial animus from Kleinert, racism is not only a personal question. Racism is a cultural system - and that minorities should find themselves disproportionately victims of police violence is a consequence much more complex than one cop, one victim. At the same time, Chief Art Acevedo's defense that APD's record on shootings is much better than that of comparable police forces - even if true - is just not sufficient.

Kleinert was reportedly well respected by his peers, and he had a clean disciplinary record. There is apparently nothing in his history that would anticipate his behavior last Friday, and even departmental spokespeople seemed genuinely puzzled, at least at first glance, that this episode took the shape it did. Some sort of overreaction to the immediate circumstances might eventually help explain it; it's also worth asking if police overreliance on weaponry in an altercation, in the same (and reinforcing) syndrome that has made the entire country awash with guns, might have something to do with yet another unnecessary shooting death.

At any rate, the APD and the Citizen Review Panel have a good deal of work and public explanation - to do, and given the public reaction, the Department of Justice may well be asked to take another look at APD policies, practices, and training. Neither attempted fraud nor running from a cop merits a summary death sentence, and the city of Austin does not need to be periodically justifying or explaining away shootings that never should have happened in the first place.

## **Green Is as Green Does**

#### ROBBINS' LATEST 'DIRECTORY' FOLLOWS THE FLOWS OF WATER - AND POWER

It's not surprising that water would be the dominant talking point of Paul Robbins' latest edition of the Austin Environmental

**Directory** – a semi-regular, comprehensive resource guide with in-depth articles on green trends and serious topics

of the day. The last directory, in 2010, delved into synthetic fuels, building on the 2006 theme of imported fossil fuels; 2003 explored green businesses as a viable economic engine for Austin; and the 2000 guide provided an environmental report card that flunked the city on everything from green building participation to curbside recycling services.

Austin has made enormous strides in the 13 years since that dismal report, evidenced in part by the new and updated content, and lists of resources, government services, and environmental organizations compiled in the 148-page issue - available for free at Half Price Books, Central Market, and other stores, and online at www.environmentaldirectory.info.

The directory includes chapters on water and the environment, green-building programs, energy-efficient home lighting, locally grown food, recycling, and much more.

As Robbins notes, the directory is probably the only print publication in the last three years that has actually grown in page count up 12 pages since 2010. There are other changes, too. The new guide has a more durable cover, and a paperback-style binding replaces the staples of yesteryear. Three years may sound like a long stretch between directories, but that's the average time it

takes Robbins to research and write the articles, solicit additional content, and then amass the thing with the assistance of other enviro-activists. Once he's finally put the publication to bed, Robbins – an angular vegan

who runs on nervous energy

collapses, recovers, and then starts gearing up for the next edition. This year's guide marks the eighth such publication since 1995, and, like the others, was financed through advertising and contributions from individuals and organizations.

As someone who's spent the last 35 years advocating for clean energy (when he isn't taking city councils to task for one thing or another), Robbins is fairly new to water-related research. He started studying the city's water policies and politics several years ago, during the early stages of debate over the controversial Water Treatment Plant No. 4. He gathered reams of documents through open records requests, and from there began connecting the dots between the plant's questionable

construction costs and the inevitable increase in water rates.

#### **DROUGHT'S SIREN CALL**

For Robbins and most other Texans, the 2011 drought and wildfires marked a turning point for how to think about water and climate change. Robbins provides a very personal account in his introduction, recalling the pounding on his door the afternoon of April 17, 2011, alerting him to the wildfire

sweeping across his Oak Hill neighborhood. His home was spared, but 20 others were destroyed. The following September, more dramatic wildfires struck in Bastrop, ravaging homes, livelihoods, trees, and wildlife across 53 square miles.

So, selecting the theme for this year's directory was a given: "Water might be the foremost environmental issue on people's minds here right now," Robbins said.

The directory breaks down the water theme in three exhaustively researched stories (thankfully written in laymen's language). The first addresses the state's dire water situation, an issue that the Legislature finally tackled this year. "Providing supplies for the 21 million more people over the next 50 years is a daunting challenge," Robbins writes in his report. "If there is a central message ... it is that Texas can no longer provide for the insatiable thirst of all who come here without either large increases in costs or creating a water-efficient economy."

The second story delves into the methods and technologies available for using less water. The third and largest article traces the early (and quite colorful) history of Austin's water and electric utilities which, as Robbins writes, is fairly reminiscent of Chinatown, the 1974 film based on the power struggle over water rights in southern California. The Austin version includes a fatal knife fight in 1878 between two council members outside a saloon on Congress Avenue, a costly dam project, and a fight against a utility monopoly that threatened to stifle the city's ability to determine its future. In the end, the city won control over both its utilities.

The chapter brings to mind the present-day debate over who should control the city's electric utility - the City Council or an independent governing board of "professionals"? Elected officials and policymakers might be better informed in their debates once they've brushed up on their utility history. Look for the chapter aptly titled "Headwaters."

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## **More Questions Than Answers in APD Shooting**

Manley said police

At a press conference Monday afternoon, Austin Police Assistant Chief Brian Manley acknowledged that the fatal shooting Friday of Larry Eugene Jackson Jr. by an APD detective was more complicated than initially described, and that it involved not simply a "foot chase," but a search in a private car commandeered by the detective.

Manley said police are "confident" that Jackson – shot and killed by APD Detective Charles Kleinert on Friday afternoon - had come to the Benchmark Bank where the detective was investigating an earlier (unrelated) robbery to "commit a fraud," and not to conduct any legitimate business.

Jackson reportedly misidentified himself when he was questioned by the bank manager that afternoon, outside the bank on West 35th Street. Jackson had previously tried to enter the bank, police said, but the door was locked because of the ongoing robbery investigation. Jackson left briefly, police said, then returned and tried again to enter the bank before he was confronted by the manager; the manager then told Kleinert, who was inside the bank conducting a

follow-up investigation of the morning robbery, about the exchange. Kleinert went outside to talk with Jackson and after a two- or three-minute conversation - captured by surveillance cameras - Jackson fled, police said.

Police said that Kleinert, dressed in plain clothes and displaying his APD credentials on his shirt collar, took off on foot after Jackson -

why he decided to pursue him immediately remains unclear. (With video of Jackson and info about his "fictitious" ID, it would seem Jackson could be found later.) Manley said that Kleinert's reasons for taking immediate action would be explored during the department's criminal and administrative inquiries into the shooting. The department will "have a better idea [of] what his intentions were" and "what was his mindset" as the investigation proceeds, Manley said. And although it's not illegal to do so, it's "really not a good idea to run from police," he said. Manley also provided a bit more information about that pursuit including that although Kleinert did initially follow Jackson on foot, he later stopped a "motorist and employ[ed] their aid," which is legal under state law.

Yet a source told the Chronicle that the motorist in question, sitting in a car in a parking lot near the bank, was unnerved by Kleinert's commandeering of the car. Indeed, the source said that Kleinert was "out of control" and did not effectively identify himself before directing the motorist to drive him around near the bank. The motorist implored Kleinert to calm down and explain what was happening, but

Kleinert declined to do so, the source said, instead telling the motorist to "Go! Go! Go!" When the pair drove up to a bridge that spans Shoal Creek, Kleinert spotted Jackson, who the source said was merely walking along the sidewalk. Kleinert reportedly said, "There he is!" before jumping out of the car. Shaken, the motorist drove away and subsequently called the police.

According to Manley, Kleinert followed Jackson under the bridge near the Shoal Creek Trail and there a scuffle

ensued; Jackson was shot once, in the back of the neck. He died just before 4:30pm, police said, Manley said police are still trying to determine what happened during the altercation and whether Kleinert's gun was fired "intentionally or accidentally."

More questions will certainly be raised about Kleinert's one-man pursuit of Jackson. According to APD policy, mere "flight by a subject who is not suspected of crimi-

nal activity shall not serve as the sole justification for engaging in a foot pursuit without the development of reasonable suspicion regarding the individual's involvement in criminal activity," reads APD's policy on foot pursuit. Deciding to "initiate

or continue" a foot chase is a "decision that an officer must make quickly and under unpredictable and dynamic circumstances," the policy continues. Foot chases place the officer and public "at significant risk," and therefore, no officer "shall

be criticized or disciplined" for deciding not to give chase, it reads. "Surveillance" - presumably including the video surveillance available outside the bank (and the same cameras that captured the movements of an alleged witness to the shooting) - and "containment" are the safest ways to track a fleeing suspect, reads the policy. Officers should "consider alternatives to engaging in or continuing a foot pursuit" under a number of specific circumstances, including when "the officer is acting alone" or when the fleeing person enters a "wooded or otherwise isolated area and there are insufficient officers to provide backup and containment."

Manley declined to release any additional information about why police believe Jackson was there to defraud the bank - or how that would be done, especially with the bank closed - or to discuss any additional details about the confrontation that led to the shooting, saying there were additional "critical" witnesses yet to be interviewed. As of Tuesday, police said Kleinert had yet to give his formal statement about the incident to internal affairs investigators.

Manley said APD extends its condolences to Jackson's family, though Jackson's sister, LaKiza Sibley, wrote in an email to the Chronicle that police have not done so personally, and merely provided notification on Saturday evening, at 5:45pm, that Jackson was dead, the victim of a police shooting. (Manley is serving as acting police chief while Chief Art Acevedo is with his mother, who is in hospice care in California.) Jackson's is the third fatality out of six officer-involved shootings

Jim Harrington, director of the Texas Civil Rights Project, says he is concerned that Austin police are overreacting and improperly using force when it is unnecessary. "These shootings seem to indicate that the police are not being properly trained and supervised and are overreacting in situations, to the peril of the citizens," he said in a press release. "We cannot tolerate this constant use of deadly force. People should not have to fear for their lives when they are in a parking lot, stopped for a traffic offense, or go to the bank." Harrington said TCRP intends to take the matter up with the U.S. Department of Justice.

Manley said that police are still searching for an alleged witness to the shooting, surveillance photos of whom police released over the weekend. Anyone able to identify the witness is asked to call the APD tip line at 512/974-6840. - Jordan Smith



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**GETTING LESS SPECIAL BY THE** DAY Abortion, juvenile justice, and road spending. Those were the three measures Gov. Rick Perry put on the call for the first special session of the 83rd Legislature. With the failure of transportation funding, the second special sputtered to a grinding halt on July 30 as both the House and Senate called sine die. Enter Special

Session Number Three, barely two hours after the second had finished. Even before the gaveling-out, Perry

had threatened to immediately recall members for another 30 days to try for another ride around the track. However, even Rep. Joe Pickett, D-El Paso, (above) the author of the transportation legislation, warned him that this would be a terrible idea, and that lawmakers need breathing room and negotiation time outside of the Capitol to come up with real solutions. Apparently, Perry wasn't listening.

**LEGISLATIVE SKIDMARKS** With Perry wrecking everyone's summer vacation, Lt. Gov. David **Dewhurst** announced that working groups from the House and Senate will meet to salvage what they can of House Joint Resolution 2, the failed transportation funding proposal. However, the Senate Finance Committee turned around and immediately approved the text of HJR 2, now renumbered SJR 1 (the House responded by gaveling straight out until Aug. 5). At heart, the bill rechannels some cash that would normally go to the Rainy Day Fund into the State Highway Fund, but there was insufficient consensus on the text during the last session to achieve passage. Out of the two, the Senate came closest to passage. On July 29, the upper chamber passed House Bill 16 (the enabling legislation for the resolution) 19-4. However, HJR 2 requires a two-thirds majority in both chambers, and when it came up in the House, it failed 84-40. The two chambers now seem at odds, with particular divisions between House and Senate Democrats. Members of the lower chamber fear the way the resolution dabbles with the requirement for a supermajority before accessing Rainy Day Fund cash, castrating the minority's negotiating power on spending issues; the Senate thinks that the current language actually beefs up that control. Expect internal finger-pointing, much as the GOP is split over whether the resolution should write an untouchable \$6 billion floor into the Rainy Day Fund.



THIRD STRIKE FOR COLLEGE CONSTRUC-TION As Perry's third call limited debate to transportation funding, it was more bad news for lawmakers pushing to discuss tuition revenue bonds.

Perry has ignored repeated bipartisan calls to add vital and overdue investment in state university buildings and infrastructure. However, lawmakers have tried to keep the issue alive: On July 30, after it was clear that HJR 2 was dead, TRBs were the only item on the House calendar. However, unless Perry adds them to the call, there can be no legislative movement.

WHERE'D EVERYBODY GO? GOP operatives were all giddy before the weekend, lighting up Twitter to castigate Sen. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, as an absentee legislator. Davis, who has been talked up as a potential gubernatorial candidate in 2014, was in D.C. for a fundraiser on July 25. Cue grumbling from three Republican Senators -Jane Nelson, Dan Patrick, and Donna Campbell – that this should not be counted as an excused absence. Sen.

Kevin Eltife, R-Tyler (generally seen as one of the better, more evenhanded of Senate proceduralists), rolled his eyes and quickly curtailed the grandstanding of his peers. Curiously, those same nabobs were silent on the final two days of the session, when neither House nor Senate was running even close to full numbers as both Dems and Republicans left town for their vacations.

KO OUT BUT STILL IN FOR HD 50 The race to replace Mark Strama in House District 50 took a strange turn as Municipal Judge Ramey Ko – so far the leading fundraiser - announced he will not run in the November special election. However, he will still run in the 2014 Democratic primary. Confused? The special election is only to finish Strama's unexpired term, and the seat will be on the ballot again next November in the regular general election. The three remaining Democrats in the special - Celia Israel, Rico Reyes, and Jade Chang Sheppard – have now been joined by Republican **Donald Dean**. - Richard Whittaker

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## **Redistricting Commission Moves On ...** With All Deliberate Speed

The critique from the audience came early in the seventh meeting of the **Independent** Citizens Redistricting Commission, the body charged with drawing maps for the eventual 10-district City Council. James Peterson, who lives in Northwest Austin, told commissioners, "Most of the concerns ... so far have seemed to be organizational overhead setting up the organization, the staff, financing, meetings, etc. ... The goal of the organization is the maps, not the organization."

The commissioners did not respond. Earlier, Chair Magdalena Blanco had announced that the ICRC would be sampling a number of meeting formats. The July 24 format relegated all of the speakers to Citizens Communication at the beginning of the meeting, but questions and responses to the speakers would wait until agenda item discussion. At that time, she explained, commission members could ask to have the speaker come back and answer questions - depending on available time.

From there, the meeting spiraled increasingly into what seemed an Ionesco play about bureaucracy. At one point, Blanco said she felt isolated from her fellow commissioners, and wondered aloud whether

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
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
the commission should look into getting smaller, portable microphones (rather than the table microphones in City Hall's Boards and Commissions Room). "I like looking at your eyes. I get a lot more feedback that way. It's personal. That's my concern," said Blanco. "We do have 17 weeks to get to December 1, and so we don't want to rush too much, but we also want to have the process go smoothly."

Later, commissioners voted on whether they should decide whether the legal counsel should be hired on a contract basis or as an employee. They voted in favor of deciding and subsequently, they voted on whether legal counsel should be hired on a contract or employee basis (see "City Redistricting Commission Wants Its Own Lawyer," July 26).

That vote wasn't immediate, however. Several motions were made, not all were seconded, and when Commissioner María Solís asked that each motion be followed through before moving on, Blanco said she was trying to avoid "blocking" the commission. The way she saw it, some motions "fall off the radar" through discussion. "If it doesn't fall off the radar, then I encourage you to please restate and come back to it," she said.

By the end of the two-and-a-halfhour meeting, the commission had decided to hire legal counsel on a contract basis and settled on a job description, since posted on the City Auditor's website. Operating under the presumption that the maps will not be subject to federal preclearance - perhaps a risky theory in light of the recent **U.S. Depart-**











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
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## **Eastman Wins; Jury Still Out on Plastic**

On July 24, a federal jury ruled in favor of Eastman Chemical Co. in its lawsuit against two affiliated local firms, CertiChem Inc. and PlastiPure Inc. Eastman had claimed that the two Austinbased companies, hoping to market their own plastic products, had published false or misleading information about the potential health effects of Eastman products. However, while the jury ruled favorably on the specific Eastman claims, the overall, long-term safety of mass-produced, widely used consumer plastics remains an open question.

We live in a world of plastic: plastic utensils, plastic cups, plastic toys for children. But few of us know what's in the products we use – or what their potential health effects might be. The chemical safety of plastics was a central issue in the lawsuit filed by Eastman, a \$9 billion chemical engineering company, against the two companies founded and co-owned by **George Bittner**, a University of Texas professor in neurobiology.

Eastman produces **Tritan**, a hard, clear plastic that's marketed as BPA- and EA-free. The chemical BPA (bisphenol A) was used in many plastic products until just a few

years ago, when studies emerged warning of adverse health effects from the chemical leaching into food – potentially including obesity, cancer, reproductive disfunction, and changes in infant behavior. Pressure from consumers led to major retailers dropping products known to contain BPA.

A related, more intractable issue has received less publicity: "estrogenic activity," or EA. EA occurs when synthetic chemicals act like estrogen in the body, interacting with estrogen receptors and disrupting the endocrine system, which regulates hor-

mones. In fact, the adverse effects of BPA are the result of EA, and there are potentially hundreds of chemicals like BPA which might negatively affect the endocrine system, especially in infants and fetuses. There is less public awareness or regulation of EA, and thousands of manufactured chemicals have entered the market without ever being tested for their effects on human health

Eastman recognizes that EA is harmful. It's a cornerstone of their marketing for

Tritan, which is used to make everything from food containers to baby bottles. However, CertiChem and PlastiPure have published research suggesting that Tritan (among other chemicals) actually does induce EA. If this is true, then companies have been selling – and consumers using – potentially dangerous products under the assumption that they're safe.

CertiChem and PlastiPure collaborate to test for EA and certify products as "PlastiPure-Safe certified EA-Free materials." PlastiPure further claims that it is the "first and only company developing plastic materials, processes, and products that are safer both for humans and the environment." Eastman asked the court for an injunction against any statements about

Tritan exhibiting EA – including a brochure PlastiPure circulated at two product expos. At trial, both Eastman and CC/PP provided a plethora of scientists and experts to defend their own and attack each other's testing methods. Following the verdict, the only thing that's clear is that EA – what it is, what causes it, and how it should be regulated – remains a contested question.

For one thing, there are very few standards for testing products for EA. The EPA recommends a "battery" of tests, but it's still debated which are the most effective and just how many are needed to confirm a product's safety. CertiChem and PlastiPure relied primaily on a test that they say is the most sensitive for detecting EA, the MCF-7. It's an "in vitro assay," meaning it's done with a cell line rather than in live animals (in vivo). Though many scientists accept that EA can be established by an in vitro test, a positive result isn't sufficient to prove a product will be harmful to humans.

Eastman made much of the "common use stressors" with which PlastiPure treated its test samples before handing them to CertiChem, including putting the samples in an autoclave, microwaving, and 24-hour exposure to UV. "They tortured the plastic," says Eastman stressing expert **Tom Pecorini**.

Yet it appears Eastman did its own test manipulation, most egregiously in an *in vivo* test in which rats were given doses of Tritan monomers (the main ingredients of the plastic resin) at a level far below the EPA-recommended testing dose. Moreover, a paper published in *Food and Chemical* 

Toxicology that evaluated Tritan stated that the authors had no conflict of interest when, in fact, the paper and testing had been funded by Eastman.

Ultimately, the jury ruled in Eastman's favor on counts of false advertising, unfair competition, and conspiracy. Bittner commented on the trial's outcome: "We were surprised and disappointed by the verdict." CertiChem and PlastiPure, which are funded largely by government grants, could be significantly affected by the outcome of the lawsuit,

and had not yet announced whether they would appeal.

The jury has ruled on CertiChem and PlastiPure, but the available research on non-BPA plastics remains incomplete and troubling. Eastman has tested only three chemicals that are components of Tritan, according to CertChem and PlastiPure lawyers, while others that may be estrogenic remain untested. And because of the low dosing levels, the results of Eastman's rat testing appear inconclusive. Finally, there have been other tests on unstressed Tritan that appear to confirm CertiChem and PlastiPure's results. The questions remain: What's in our plastics, and what could it do to us? Given the products' ubiquity, consumers still need to know. - Ann Chen

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### 'Weird Rodeo' at the Scottish Rite

When Emily Marks became artistic director of the Austin Scottish Rite Theater in January of last year, she hit the ground running. The space soon became a creative hub. offering an eclectic mix of family programming, music, and comedy. Summer days were booked with camps to develop the next generation of Austin creativity. By most measures, Marks' tenure was a success. So it came as a shock to many in the community when, last week, she was abruptly fired.

According to former Executive Producer John Riedie, also fired last week, that termination was the culmination of a monthslong campaign against Marks, sparked by her attempts to run the theatre independently from the Scottish Rite fraternity. Although the Scottish Rite gifted the building to the nonprofit theatre, Masons retained control of the board. Riedie says Marks was raising alarms because Scottish Rite involvement threatened the theatre's mission.

Indeed, minutes of the June 18, 2012 Board of Directors meeting reflect that Marks addressed the board with concerns about bylaw changes deepening Scottish Rite involvement - including giving the Masons sole authority to choose board members, and applying Scottish Rite rent payments as donations. That meeting's minutes read, "The Executive Director does not feel comfortable applying for grants relating the mission of providing 'Community & Children's Theatre' if the charter purpose of the corporation is not be[ing] followed due to the involvement of the Scottish Rite in Board decisions and business."

Around that time, Marks' relationship with the Board and some members of the fraternity began to sour. Riedie describes a culture of intimidation. He says there were weekly complaints from Masons about Marks, and incidents when Masons would padlock equipment to prevent use. He remembers occasions when a Scottish Rite member would refuse to shake Marks' hand. As Riedie describes it, it was a "weird rodeo of bullshit. They had a Mad Men-esque, retrograde way of handling professional women. Some bullied her. I saw one man get in her face shaking with rage." Riedie says the harassment got to a point that he and Marks formed a mutual evacuation plan.

Although the Board was made aware of those occurrences, Riedie says they were never adequately addressed. What's more, the Board appeared to be covering its tracks. After both he and Marks were terminated, the theatre quickly severed all ties with productions involving the pair. Performances of Charlotte's Web, which featured Marks as a cast member, were cancelled with only two days notice. On July 24, 35 participants in Mother Falcon's Music Lab were turned away by Scottish Rite brothers with the explanation that the building was deemed unsafe. A subsequent call to the fire department, Riedie says, revealed that no inspection of the building had occurred prior to that Wednesday.

Meanwhile, the fate of the theatre as a cultural institution remains unknown. Riedie says that although his contract gave him 180 days to complete work already in progress after termination, he is unsure if that programming will be allowed to happen. The summer camp series was also interrupted, with one group, "Puppet Pandemonium," still struggling to find a home. - Brandon Watson

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
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#### FORGET STUDENT LOANS - MAKE HIGHER ED FREE

Well, finally! Hard-right congressional leaders and the **Obama White House** have agreed that interest rates on student loans should not double to nearly 7%, as they let happen early in July. Instead, college students will be billed at a rate that will steadily rise to above 8%.

This is progress?

Well, yes - in that this year's rate would drop to 3.8%. But, for the longer run, obviously not. Even capping the interest rate at 8.25%, as the White House demanded, is too high, for it still saddles students with a crushing debt of some

\$20,000 to \$40,000 for a four-year degree, just as they're getting started on their economic path.

But worse, lawmakers are playing small ball, avoiding the big issue. Bickering over percentages shrivels the public debate to its most picayune and meanest point, which our so-called leaders seem to specialize in these days. They focus on the price of everything,

without grasping the value of anything. And the value of a college education - not only to America's youth, but most significantly to our whole society's economic and democratic future - is clearly established.

So the big question we should be asking is

this: Why isn't higher education free? As **Les Leopold** of the Labor Institute notes in a July 2 AlterNet piece, "For over 150 years, our nation has recognized that tuition-free primary and secondary schools were absolutely vital to the growth and functioning of our commonwealth." Today, open access to

a college degree or other advanced training is as vital to America as a high school diploma has been in our past.

Forget interest rates, our young people should not be blocked by a massive debtload from getting the education that they need – and that all of America needs them to have - for our mutual prosperity and democratic strength.



#### City money season: the dollars are chasing the needs

City Council officially returns to City Hall today (Aug. 1) from its summer hiatus, to engage the year's major recurring task approving the city budget - a lengthy process that resumes this morning with the presentation of the proposed budget by city staff, Officially, City Manager Marc Ott proposes the next year's budget (Oct. 1 marks the beginning of Fiscal Year 2014), and council disposes. Council will revise departmental requests as it deems necessary, adjust and balance projected costs vs. anticipated needs, allocate uncommitted funds (a relatively tiny portion of a \$3 billion All Funds budget), and in light of all those preliminary decisions, settle on a tax rate.

In pragmatic terms, much of next year's budget detail is in fact settled by now, simply because city business is ongoing, most costs are structural and predictable, determined by contract, or reflect consistent city policies that are built into the budget's framework. But the budget preparation process, which is a year-round task that appears before council first in the spring, inevitably means changes in detail, unanticipated developments, and new or concluded projects that alter the financial plans.

#### **Spring Forward**

First, a brief recap: When the budget staff presented the preliminary numbers and projections to City Council in April, the tone was cautious optimism. Continued steady economic recovery from the recession, Deputy Chief Financial Officer Ed Van Eenoo told the members, meant the city was also in better financial shape overall; nevertheless, structural cost drivers - additional public safety staff, rising health insurance costs (although those have slowed somewhat), and a few new programs - would mean an additional \$29.1 million in costs over FY 2013, for an estimated \$784

million General Funds budget (the portion that excludes the "enterprise" or profitmaking departments). For more detail, see "Happy Times ... in Moderation," April 26.

The budget office was in the process of finalizing the latest figures last week, when I asked Van Eenoo if much had changed since spring, as sometimes happens. "Things haven't changed very much, really at all," he said. In some years unanticipated costs develop over the summer, and occasionally, even new revenue appears - a few years ago, especially intense summer heat meant extra income for Austin Energy and an accordingly larger contribution to the GF. That won't happen this year, as council has since changed

prices. In April, the budget office estimated that Austin's overall property evaluation would show a 6% increase - the certified numbers received this week confirm an increase of 5.9%.

Those income numbers, of course, have a major influence on the overall budget, and more specifically, on the projected property tax rate. The "nominal rate" is the current 50.29 cents per \$100 assessed value, which presumably (with rising property values) would bring in more money without a change; the "effective rate" (not yet determined, but lower than the nominal rate) would result in the same income for the city. Judging from the early Council buzz, while Council may bump the rate a bit to accommodate rising costs, there's no enthusiasm to approach the "rollback rate" (more than a 5% increase), which would trigger an election.

#### From the Dais

All the council members who commented said they were waiting to hear what the city manager proposes before making any budget decisions. But Mayor Lee Leffingwell, who has come to be the default economic conservative on the current council, said that in advance, "I'm going to be pushing as hard as I can to make certain that public safety is adequately funded, in particular maintaining, at a very minimum, the cadet classes we've planned, and maintaining our standard of two officers per thousand [residents]." That's been a somewhat contentious (though still council-majority) standard of late, with Council Member Bill Spelman in particular criticizing it as a

The same sort of push-pull on costs and taxes was an undertone from other council members. Mayor Pro Tem Sheryl Cole said she has always supported the two officers per thousand standard, and that council has "a responsibility as we go forward to keep that ratio." But she is also persistently concerned about the city's overall "affordability," in which she includes everything from basic housing costs to the property tax rate itself. "We haven't seen all the unmet needs yet," she noted. "It's hard to balance all the costs of the city with the needs of the city, because eventually they become the same thing. ... It's always difficult, trying to find a balance."

Council Member Laura Morrison, on the other hand, remains skeptical about projected public safety costs as well as the two officers per thousand APD rate. "I've always supported being more flexible than that," she said. She noted that APD brass has requested another 45 sworn officers beyond the "2.0 standard," and "they've taken the nighttime trails [the 24-hour greenbelt trail pilot added at mid-year] and asked for additional officers to take on that responsibility. If we were to do that, we would be busting the budget all over the place. My thought is that we should stick with what we normally do or decrease it, and try to invest in things that prevent crime."

the transfer formula and capped it (for the present) at \$105 million per year.

This year, says Van Eenoo, there aren't many surprises. For example, the sales tax projections, which have been strong over last year, remain in the ballpark of predictions. "At the time of the forecast, back in April," he said, "we were anticipating about 9 percent growth rate for the year, and right now we're at about 8.5 percent. So we're still in the same percentage area for sales tax growth."

Sales taxes account for about 21% of GF. Property taxes represent about 41%. and Van Eenoo received certified numbers from the Travis Central Appraisal District this week. Overall, those evaluations were expected to rise, both because of new construction and rising market mechanical metric whose only virtue is simplicity. Spelman has called for more flexibility both in overall hiring and in moving certain Austin Police Department functions to non-sworn-officer (and therefore less expensive) personnel. But Leffingwell calls "two officers per thousand" a bare minimum, and notes that last year, a staffing study by the Police Executive Research Forum actually recommended more sworn officers ("Report: APD Understaffed," by Jordan Smith, July 13, 2012).

Of course, since public safety already consumes roughly two-thirds of the GF budget, hiring more cops has inevitable tax consequences. On that score, said Leffingwell, "I think there's going to be great emphasis on trying to hold the line on



Council Member Kathie Toyo seconded Morrison's concerns, particularly emphasizing investment in more programs for at-risk youth, partially as a way of reducing public safety costs at the front end, before young people drift into anti-social activities. Tovo has been pressing both her council colleagues and staff on youth programs in the past year, and says she'll be watching the proposed budget to see if those efforts are going to be rewarded. She mentioned both the Parks and Recreation budget and the Library as areas that have endured more than their share of cuts over the last few budget cycles, noting that these are both areas where youth programs can show direct social (and long-term, money-saving) benefits.

Tovo also mentioned the Neighborhood Housing and Community Development Department as having suffered too much in recent austerity cuts, and echoed Cole in saying that the city needs to maintain its ongoing affordable housing programs. Cole in particular is concerned that ongoing affordability programs not get lost in the potential push for another November housing bond vote - which would also have its own property tax implications.

Tovo considered the public safety issue briefly from the other side of the equation. She noted that she's already receiving emails from residents who want to make certain that public safety remains fully supported in the upcoming budget. She said

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
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
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#### USES OF FUNDS/GENERAL FUNDS

she understands that public safety is a high priority item on any list of city needs, but noted that people pressing for more spending on any city need – including public safety, already *the* major budget item – "need to understand that there are definite consequences in terms of taxes."

She added that she looks forward to the "always lively" discussion of two officers per thousand, but she'll be looking for a balance. Like other members, Tovo said, "My operating principle is to keep as close to the effective rate as we possibly can. Many families in our community are struggling, and we need to make sure that we're keeping the tax rate as low as possible."

## Unmet Needs ... and Employees

As always in budget discussions, one citizen's necessity is another's frivolous expense, and this year will be no different. Beyond the base budget to be proposed this week - estimated last spring to be roughly \$29 million in the red before anything is added - are staff-determined "unmet service demands" that council will consider as potential additional expenditures. The city's list, compiled from public surveys, compiled department needs lists, and manager review, amounts to a grand total of \$34.4 million, of which \$20.16 million is defined as "priority" unmet needs (see details below). These priority items range from \$310,000 requested by Municipal Court (for rehabilitation services, where backlogs reverberate throughout the criminal justice system) to \$8.1 million for new APD staff (83 new fulltime equivalents, including 45 derived from those PERF recommendations). While the lion's share of "unmet needs" overall remains in public safety, there are also priority requests for Parks, Libraries, Neighborhood Housing, etc. - the city manager and council will have to decide how many of those \$34 million in priorities can be addressed in one budget year.

APA President Wayne Vincent confirmed that his union "wanted to make sure that there would be an opportunity for city employees to get a pay raise ... and a bite at the apple."

Even before they get to that, however, there are broader cost drivers to consider. Last spring, all three public safety union contracts - police, fire, emergency medical services – remained to be negotiated, leaving the budget office to speculate what the resulting budget impact might be. Van Eenoo provided council with two potential "forecast scenarios" - one reflecting no raises, one reflecting 3% raises for all 12,000 city employees - and described the latter as "unsustainable" even at the rollback tax rate. Since then, the Austin Police Association contract has been negotiated and approved, and its financial terms reflect a 1.5% increase for sworn officers. That's right in the budget department's anticipated wheelhouse, and shouldn't cause too much of a budgetary

ripple. But Fire and EMS remain in negotiation and uncertain; the Austin Firefighters Association talks were just suspended, although the issue that led to an impasse is not money but hiring procedures. The budget may have to move forward without certainty for those departments.

Beyond that is the larger question of non-public-safety employees, not under contract but represented indirectly by the AFSCME union. AFSCME Business Manager Greg Powell has been reading the budget office's projections since the spring, and he's unimpressed. "This is a \$2 billion budget," Powell said. "What we're talking about, in terms of a raise for city employees, is about a \$12 million item. ... It's a matter of priorities."

Powell says the union will be pressing City Hall hard for a significant raise. "We've looked at city of Austin employees trying to stay abreast of the cost of living in Austin over the last several years," he said. "Our numbers show about a 17-18 percent increase in the cost of living in the Austin metro area over the last five years, and our members having received about 10 percent increase over that same five years. Our city employees have fallen behind, in regards to just stay abreast of the cost of living." Powell argues that if there's "no money" for raises, as management is claiming, it's because managers have been spending too much money on administration and bureaucracy.

"It's a matter of what's important to you," meaning city management, Powell insisted. "If what's important to you is building a bureaucracy for what is, if not the 'bestmanaged city in the country' [a Marc Ott slogan] certainly the 'most-managed city in the country.' We're looking at an expansion of bureaucracy at the city of Austin that's

unprecedented." Moreover, Powell said, the APA settled at 1.5% because the union reps were aware Austin police are already the highest paid in the state, and they also wanted to "create some space" for a broader employee increase. Asked for his perspective, APA President Wayne Vincent confirmed that his union "wanted to make sure that there would be an opportunity for city employees to get a pay raise ... and a bite at the apple."

So expect city employees to be heard from in the coming weeks, arguing that their families' "unmet needs" should be at least as much a budgetary priority as Planning and Development Review (a \$2.6 million bump). In the absence of an actual budget recommendation, council members were noncommittal on raises. "We have terrific staff at the city, and we want to make sure we retain them," said Tovo. "But we need to make sure that we operate within our means."

Meanwhile, other groups have already been lobbying council members on particular issues. To take only one example, a newly formed coalition – whose members include the Austin Parks Foundation, the Trail Foundation, Tree Folks, Keep Austin Beautiful, and the Shoal Creek Conservancy – are calling themselves "Great Austin Parks" ("to marshall support for more funding for the Austin Parks and Recreation Department in the upcoming

city budget"). GAP (www.greataustinparks.org) is advocating a \$4.75 million increase in parks funding, for "trees, trails, maintenance, and pools."

It's not yet clear if that recommendation is over and above the unmet needs request already made by PARD, but council members are already hearing about it. Both Morrison and Tovo mentioned the new group, and Cole noted that the city needs to design a "multiyear approach," especially on operations and maintenance, to address park needs throughout the city. "One of the chief metrics for parks is how many acres have we acquired," Cole said, "instead of how well are we maintaining the condition of the parks. ... I think people would rather have fewer parks that are well-maintained than many that are not."

And so the discussion begins – or persists, since in this budget cycle we are likely to hear many things we have heard before, and will hear again. More than one council member mentioned "special events" – specifically, whether the numerous departmental requests (e.g., for more police officers) citing special events as creating an unmet need might mean that "these private events need to be covering their costs."

Beyond these big-ticket items, the list will certainly go on. As Cole put it, "We're going to face a medley of unmet needs – along with the age-old question of how to pay for them."

When Everything Changed: The Amazing Journey of American Women from 1960 to the Present. She returned to The Times as a columnist in July 2007.

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

## **Hotbox**

MASS GALLERY ESTABLISHES AN ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCY PROGRAM AT ITS NEW HOME



A Close Encounters: Hotbox Residency event will take place Saturday, Aug. 3 at MASS Gallery, 507 Calles. Hotbox artists-in-residence Jill Pangallo and Jules Buck Jones will host an open studio 4-7pm, then Pangallo will present Unfollow, her latest multimedia, social mediathemed performance, at 7pm. For more information, visit www.massgallery.org.

"Well, it started in the old space, where we wanted to invite artists to have a residency in our studios with no AC during the summer. Literally, a hot box," laughs MASS Gallery founding member Jules Buck Jones as he recalls how the gallery's budding residency program was first discussed. An idea left over from the original space, which was housed off Springdale Road in a former auto-body shop, has come to life in the new 1,500-square-foot gallery and studio that MASS currently occupies on Calles. The new gallery opened its doors earlier this year and has continued the MASS legacy of experimental art.

The Hotbox program was founded around some distinctive principles. The artists were asked to use the space in a way that was unique to their work and invite the public to witness the process and development of their pieces. Jones admits that the application process for this first year was loose, with no formal submission requirements for potential attendees. Rather, the selection of participants was shaped by the talent MASS had already begun to cultivate. The gallery felt it important to showcase artists at different stages in their careers, so it chose a student artist, a local artist, and an artist from out of town to fill out the five-week program. Jory Drew, an Austin native and now a student at the Art Institute of Chicago, opened the Hotbox program with Jones on July 19. The gallery was divided in half, with Drew

showing completed installation work and Jones shifting between large-scale sculptures and a stop-motion video.

Featured artist and founding MASS Gallery member Jill Pangallo, who will be presenting work at one of Hotbox's "Close Encounters" events on Aug. 3, acknowledges that the program thus far has been both forgiving and flexible. Her proposal included podcasts with 10 different local artists and arts administrators who focus on performance work. "I have never done a podcast," chuckles Pangallo, but her interest in storytelling and aspirations to accomplish something new during her residency inspired her choice. Pangallo seeks to explore the self-perceived genius exercised by Internet users in the digital age in her other pieces, one of which includes a reading based on TripAdvisor reviews.

Hotbox emphasizes exploring the creative process. By participating in a residency, artists are removed from their routines and comfort zones to immerse themselves in a wholly creative enterprise. Though Drew, Jones, and Pangallo are all familiar with the Austin landscape, MASS hopes to expand Hotbox to bring in artists who are entirely new to the city and can offer a dynamic perspective to the art scene. On the idea of pushing the experimental envelope with upcoming artists, Jones says, "I appreciate that the work we show is jarring. That's what we want to hear. That's what we want it to be."

MASS Gallery hopes to house and host talent that is unafraid to take risks; Hotbox is a testament to that. It will be interesting to see what new forms MASS takes on in its efforts to launch developing artists into the public eye, but whatever the future lineup, it will undoubtedly be a unique cast of characters.

## Cecelia Phillips

#### BETWEEN STUDIOS AT PRESENT, THIS PAINTER OF GEODES TALKS ABOUT THE NEED TO HAVE HER WORKSPACE CLOSE

"I was growing my hair out and wanted to keep it straight, so I went to see a stylist," an innocuous lead-in from painter Cecelia Phillips as to how she came to make the small glowing paintings of geodes that until recently (we'll get to that in a minute) hung on her studio walls. "It was the stylist's birthday, and she was going geode hunting later in the day. I kinda had a little crush on her, so I told her I could make her a geode painting." For an artist long interested in both portraiture and landscape, the subject seemed like a natural fit - as it was an homage to her stylist as well as a representation of the stuff landscape is made of.

But back to Phillips' workspace: Perhaps the most important thing to know about her studio is, for the time being, it doesn't exist.

Cecelia Phillips: I'm actually moving studios now, so I'm starting over in a new place. I had been in the last space for about two and a half years and had shared it with a musician. Sharing with someone who is creative but doesn't work in the same media can be wildly interesting, as you can talk about the creative process. I've always enjoyed sharing space - I like absorbing information while I'm working.

Austin Chronicle: Since it's difficult to see your studio at the moment, what's your studio look/feel like when you're in high work mode? In a Iull?

**CP:** High work mode and a lull! My studio can be kind of a crazy mess of stuff no matter what. I have bits and scraps of everything - little crystals and plants and postcards from 10 years ago. I'm the type of person who can get inspired by a quick and fleeting moment, so I've always surrounded myself with stuff to look at or get interested in. During a lull period, you might also find other kinds of things in the studio that I'm working on - maybe knitting or embroidery.

AC: Because the room is small, does that force you to work small? Or if not, how do you work big in a smaller space?



CP: I will admit that I do work with size constraints being in a smaller room, but I actually prefer to work small. I feel like what I'm doing right now requires an intimate scale, and when I've tried to make the geodes larger they lose their power. Important to my work is a quickness and immediacy, so I've enjoyed doing paintings that are "gestures," completed within a day or two. They each reflect a day in my life, and so a feeling of time. There might be a time and place where I do longer-term, large-scale paintings, but I'm really happy with where I am right now.

AC: Are there benefits to having your studio in your home? Do you wish you could have a studio elsewhere?

CP: It's an interesting experience to have a studio in your house, because it can be really easy to wander in and out of work to do other things. "Well, this piece isn't doing what I want to right

> now - I'll make some coffee/clean my kitchen/play with my cat, etc." But that can also be very good for

me, because whenever I get a bright idea, I can just go back into that space rather than having to travel there. One of the great things a mentor of mine told me was that you should be in your studio eight hours a day. You could be there reading the newspaper or working with white-hot intensity – as long as you were there.

Because if you aren't there when the moment hits, you're screwed. I like treating my house as a creative place, because I don't ever miss a moment.

## We Don't Think They're Not in **Kansas Anymore**

Austin's Rubber Repertory rents a former church in Kansas and fills it with a diversity of artists

If two people – one in Austin, one in Los Angeles – are going to, on a whim, rent a former church on the east side of Lawrence, Kansas, and turn it into an experimental artists' colony for a year, of course those two people will be the Rubber Rep boys.

Josh Meyer and Matt Hislope, founders and directors of the Rubber Repertory theatre company, had gone on indefinite hiatus following their original, stunning Jubilee at the Off Center in April 2012. After 10 years of bringing this city such odd and compelling spectacles as the Biography of Physical Sensation and Surprise Annie and The Casket of Passing Fancy and Mister Z Loves Company, the two University of Kansas alumni staged their final public show and parted ways: Meyer to L.A., to ply his commercial-acting trade and reignite a romantic connection there; Hislope to return to a gig among the hardworking jesters of Esther's Follies on Sixth Street.

But opportunities present themselves to those who are open to them, and the best laid plans of mice et cetera, and this socalled "hiatus" didn't last very long. Because now Meyer is leaving California and Hislope is leaving Texas, and for 12 solid months they're going to run what they're calling the Pilot Balloon Church-House in Kansas and ride herd on (and potentially collaborate with) a swiftly changing roster of 72 visiting artists from around the country and beyond. Specifically, according to the latest Pilot Balloon press release, "While Austin artists account for close to half of those invited, artists from 10 states and four different countries are represented."

The grand and roomy venue housing all this imminent industry began as a German Methodist church in 1872, erected less than a decade after much of Lawrence was burned to the ground during the Civil War. In the Nineties, the church was converted to a single-family home; it was more recently remodeled again, although, if you see the place, church is still the first word that comes to mind. It's a substantial chunk of real estate, ves. but was discovered by Meyer within the less concrete arena of cyberspace - where the Rubber Rep boys also raised enough money to fund this latest creative endeavor. And recently, we leveraged the digital realm ourselves to bring you this interview briefly illuminating the duo's process of discovery and engagement.

Austin Chronicle: What put this idea in your heads in the first place?

**Josh Meyer:** I saw the real estate listing on Facebook and got a little dreamy about it. "You mean, for the price of a one bedroom in Los Angeles, I could get a whole church in Lawrence, Kansas? And then maybe this church could be filled with all sorts of interesting visitors?" It's a trade that appealed to both my thrifty and impulsive sides. But really, the idea would have died on the page were it not for a few people who goaded me into action.

Matt Hislope: I'm not really on Facebook, but like so many great things that have happened to me during the course of our 15-year relationship, it began with Josh notifying me that he'd had an idea. We got sort of serious for about 15 minutes and then decided to go for it.

*AC*: Which meant ... renting it for a year? Meyer: Yes – sight unseen. I sent an email to the owner that delicately described the artists' residence idea, then we talked on the phone for a bit. My email was so out of left field that he wanted to make sure I wasn't a Nigerian prince. As the project became more formalized, we also had to assure the owner that we weren't planning on erecting a stage in the church or hosting any big public spectacles. It really is a place for artists to come and hunker down and do their work.

Hislope: We're also looking at opportunities for visiting artists to get involved in the community, either through the Lawrence Arts Center or one of the universities or any number of service organizations. Josh and I have already volunteered to judge the potluck at the neighborhood association's annual block party.

AC: So, Josh, you're leaving L.A., and, Matt, you're leaving Austin in order to run this Pilot Balloon program for a year? You'll be there throughout the whole project?

Meyer: Yes, we'll be there throughout learning to be good hosts, working on new projects together, mowing grass, shoveling snow. If this experiment is a success, it might be fun to do a pop-up artists' colony at a different site every few years. Marfa would be a good sequel.

Hislope: Yes, it's my farewell tour at Esther's. My last show is July 27th. Maybe I'll stick to my yearlong-stint-every-sevenyears pattern and return when I'm 40.

AC: And you opened up these residencies to artists from all over? With a focus on ...?

Meyer: We emphasized "experimental artists of all disciplines," but a hefty portion of the 85-plus applicants were performanceoriented artists. Not all experimental, but all creators of new work; and, most surprisingly, there wasn't a single dud in the bunch. We could've filled the calendar twice over if we'd admitted all the applicants and given them the full amount of time they'd requested. We mainly spread the word through our friends and artistic communities, but we also reached out to some people we didn't know. There's a book called Emergency Index that documents hundreds of performances from 2011. I dog-eared the pages of artists who seemed like a good fit and emailed them directly. We ended up admitting six people from that group.

**Hislope:** And that was really exciting, that it wasn't just our friends and colleagues who already trust us, but also artists who didn't know us from Adam.

AC: You've funded this through Kickstarter? Meyer: Indiegogo, actually. We raised \$9,186 during a monthlong Indiegogo campaign and were pretty much knocked sideways by people's generosity in helping us make this happen. We're still looking for a bit more money elsewhere. The funds are being used to reduce artist fees to \$50 a week and cover a good portion of our utilities and household expenses. Matt and I will pay about 60 percent of the rent ourselves. On a sidenote, our \$250 perk for the crowdfunding campaign allowed a person to submit a prayer or poem that will be recited out loud each day that we're in residence, and my Aunt Marie gave us the gift of "Pied Beauty" by Gerard Manley Hopkins.

AC: And will there be documentation of this Pilot Balloon project?

Meyer: I'm hoping the works that are created will provide their own sort of documentation, but, beyond that, we'll be vigorously maintaining our guest book and starting a Tumblr to keep people apprised of what's happening throughout the year.









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

**One Night With Janis Joplin**

As Zach concludes its first season in the now-familiar Topfer Theatre, I wish they'd made the seats in there removable. Never before at a theatrical event have I so wanted to stand up and dance as I did during One Night With Janis Joplin. The performers and designers nail the show's conceit as a rock & roll concert one night with the enigmatic queen of rock herself – but instead of rocking out, passing around joints, and taking swigs from Lone Star bottles, audience members are mostly confined to their seats, sipping beer from straws out of plastic cups with lids.

It felt stuffy to me to sit and watch as Kacee Clanton put far more than just a little piece of her heart into a powerful performance of Janis that left everyone in the audience grinning and grooving. I wanted to get up and jam with her, man! After playing Janis on-and-off for more than 10 years, Clanton has mastered the singer's salty and sweet demeanor, not to mention that epochal wail. And with more than 20 musical numbers in the show, including all of the greatest hits, Clanton oozes Janis' Ioneliness, pain, and passion over and over again. "Music is everything," she says during one interlude. "It turns on that switch in your brain: Maybe I can do anything."

One Night With Janis Joplin is more a hymn to Joplin's musical influences than it is the story of her troubled and freewheeling life. In addition to a shredding backup band and an energetic trio of "Joplinaires" (Felicia Dinwiddie, Tricky Jones, and Janis understudy Cari Hutson), playwright/director Randy Johnson throws a blues singer (Tiffany Mann) into the mix to embody Janis' idols. Mann's versatile voice shatters and soothes, booms and floats,



haunts and enlivens. She is, in a word, outstanding, From Nina Simone to Etta James and Aretha Franklin, Mann (aided by Susan Branch Towne's glamorous costumes) embodies the sorrow and joy of the blues world that so enchanted Janis Joplin.

As Janis grieves for Bessie Smith's untimely death, we see one of just two allusions in the show to Janis' infamous departure from this life: "People, whether they know it or not, like their blues singers miserable. They like their blues singers to die." But that darkness is relegated to the corners of One Night With Janis Joplin; the show remembers Janis as she lived, not as she died. By focusing on her music, Johnson further remembers only select pieces of Janis' life; the less palatable things, like her substance abuse and promiscuity, are somewhat obscured. Nonetheless, One Night With Janis Joplin is a beautiful, soulful portrait of the artist, and Zach's exhilarating production will leave you wishing you could have danced all night.

A Chorus Line is now accepted as a classic of modern musical theatre, despite all the reasons why it shouldn't have worked in the first place. An almost bare stage, virtually no costumes, no star to speak of: It's missing a lot of the reasons why people flock to musicals.

But they do flock to this one, and it's because what the musical does have is heart. It's about 17 dancers competing for eight coveted spots on the chorus line of a musical - not a leading role, just a supporting part that will help them pay their bills

for a few more months and keep their careers alive. It's a behind-the-scenes view of what it is to be a professional workaday performer, but more than that, it's about what it is to strive for something almost unattainable, and what happens when the dream becomes increasingly unlikely to pay out.

The Long Center production, in conjunction with Houston company Theatre Under the Stars, hit its mark ably. Martin Harvey played Zach, the director running the audition who begins as a tired. Simon Cowell-esque observer but eventually reveals a sympathetic streak. He leads the dancers through their paces, and after an initial round of cuts, he informs the remaining dancers that

he wants to know more than just whether or not they can dance. He wants to know if they could fit in on his chorus line, too. What emerges are the personalities of all 17 dancers, one by one, as we learn their backstories. It's based on the lives of actual dancers from when the initial production was created in the Seventies, but not a whole lot has changed in that time, for better or worse. Dancers and singers still struggle to make a living in show business. Anybody who's been to a cattle call audition themselves might get hit with a few flashbacks, painful or otherwise, from the depressing nature of the game.

With no starring role per se, it's hard to pick standouts from the large cast of equals. The ensemble was strong as an ensemble. In the Long Center/TUTS production, A Chorus Line began with broad and occasionally clumsy strokes, but it eventually moved to a place of genuine storytelling. The strongest moments included Paul (Jordan Fife Hunt) recounting his less-than-prestigious beginnings as a dancer, and Cassie (Jessica Lee Goldyn), the former star, fighting with Zach for the chance to join the ranks once again.

The production has departed the Long Center, but it still deserves mention as a strong presentation of a great musical that is worth seeing when the opportunity arises. - Elizabeth Cobbe

#### 'The 2013 Tiny Park Drawing Annual' Tiny Park Gallery, 1101 Navasota #2 www.tinyparkgallery.com Through Aug. 31

"The 2013 Tiny Park Drawing Annual" is a shake-up, a needed reminder of the possible intersections and interdependencies of form and content that provides an expanded lingua franca for the artistic practice of drawing.

The lifework of Austin's Claude van Lingen, collected under the name 1000 Years From Now, demonstrates a process that destroys the work as it reaches its maximum intensity. Van Lingen writes names, under headings such as "Religions of the World" or "Countries of the World," with graphite on paper until the paper disintegrates. The effect on the viewer is similar to that of Kafka's "In the Penal Colony," in which prisoners enter a machine that tattoos them with a word representing their crimes until it kills them

David Culpepper pushes the idea of drawing into sculpture, producing work that literally brings engineering and architecture off the page. The foremost example would be R.T.D., a collection of radio towers screenprinted on chipboard, cut, and assembled. In the four pieces tacked to the gallery walls, structures drawn in marker and pencil have been cut out of paper, with at least one edge remaining uncut. In two drawings, those points of connectivity merely recognize the source material, but in Cassiopeia and Hercules the plane provided by the paper links the physical structure pouring out of it to heavenly bodies drawn above, suggesting the difficult proposition of viewing the ethereal and the corporeal through equal measures.



Calixto Ramirez's piece Linea en el paisaje II, being a MiniDV NTSC video, pushes the boundary of drawing the furthest. The Mexico City-based artist has depicted a rocky landscape, ocean in the distance, and a human figure waving or pointing. Translated as A Line in the Landscape, the piece seems to be an attempt to capture evidence of the elusive perfect line somewhere in nature, in this case formed by the horizon appearing in a dip between rock formations.

Returning to the page, University of Texas lecturers Sara Frantz and Rob Verf provide distinctly different views on landscapes. Frantz emphasizes human-made structures that cut through nature, by drawing around them. The graphite on paper works depict the buildings as negative space in the midst of finely detailed surroundings, while Cantilever I, using gouache and graphite, emphasizes the structures with bright colors cutting through trees.

Verf creates satellite images out of coffee "spills," acrylic, and pencil. The collection, titled Landscape in a Figure, has an infograph feel, but the works are abstract suggestions of landscapes.

If we were to search for some kind of thesis in the exhibition, then we might find it not in range of technique, but in degrees of abstraction - the concept of drawing changes with the idea it's trying to express, the ideas naturally being the impetus to test new methods.

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


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

## Sausage Fest

#### BANGER'S DOES BRATS RIGHT, BUT IT'S THE MORE ADVENTUROUS MENU ITEMS THAT REALLY SING

Banger's may not be the newest or the hippest establishment on Rainey Street, but it certainly is one of the most fun, laid-back, and dog-friendly in the area. Going strong after recently hitting its first anniversary, Banger's is a welcome breath of fresh air among the übercool ethos that permeates some of the neighborhood's other spots. What

may surprise the uninitiated is that despite the fact that Banger's is clearly a sausage restaurant, it offers some of the best food on Rainey, period, overshadowed only by the magnificent El Naranjo.

Owner Ben Siegel adapted everything he loved about traditional German biergartens and translated those elements into an Austin-infused ambience that appears to please everyone. The biergarten aesthetic is clear from the moment you

arrive. On the huge patio, extra-large picnic tables invite communal seating under the trees, which are permanently decked with festive strings of lights. There's a covered stage that hosts a variety of seasonal entertainment, as well as a huge cinder block grill for special outdoor events like their popular pig roasts and Oktoberfest. To complete the "everyone's welcome" philosophy, there is a fenced-in section for doggies, complete with bowls and a large water cooler. The menu even offers special sausages for our canine friends.

sphere continues with communal seating, blackboards announcing specials, and a bar with more than 100 taps of craft brews. Beers are classified on the menu by flavor profile and style, and the offerings include an excellent selection from Austin as well as the rest of Texas. The efficient and friendly servers are dressed in mock biergarten outfits not quite lederhosen but shorts, white shirts, and vests seem to be the norm. Siegel also set out to create a menu that steps outside the boundaries of what we expect a sausage restaurant to be. Sure, there are classics like bratwurst with sauerkraut and bangers & mash, but the kitchen specializes in unexpected and creative dishes

Inside, the beer hall atmo-

that challenge people's expectations of how sausage can be served.

The ample selection of house-made sausages includes traditional, exotic, and vegetarian choices that can be customized with three bun options (kolache, pumpernickel wheat, and pretzel) and a variety of toppings and sauces. There are also seasonally driven chef's specials, served either in a bun or as a plate with appropriate sides, all affordably priced and nicely presented, as well as a good selection of sides and appetizers. On a recent visit, one of my fellow diners proclaimed the Currywurst (\$10) as the real deal while recalling his days curing hangovers with Berlin's street food. I quite enjoyed Dah Bulgogi (\$8), chicken sausage topped with Sriracha, oyster sauce, cilantro, carrots, fiery jalapeños, and kimchi for a Korean twist on a bánh mì. It didn't

really need the side of soy caramel, but this sweetbuttery-salty concoction was so sublime, I ate it by itself. From the entrée department, we chose the fried chicken (\$10), plump chicken sausage wrapped in chicken skin, breaded, and deep-fried. That crisp creation came on a bed of skin-on mashers with a crumbly homemade biscuit which turned out to be a great vehicle for the soy caramel. The kitchen also redefines sausage with a cool selec-

tion of vegetarian options such as the Veggie BLT (\$8), a crushed sundried tomato sausage infused with cheese curds, topped with shiitake mushroom "bacon," field greens, and onion aioli on a kolache bun.

Everything we've ever tasted at Banger's has been fresh and delicious. As a beer, sausage, and dog lover, I fully embrace this unique establishment and look forward to many more visits. Next time, I'll try to save some room for that house-made Snickers ice cream (\$5) served in a jar.

## food-o-file

There was a little flurry of activity on Twitter this weekend when local people started talking about buying cronuts at the scratch bakery in the new **H-E-B at** Mueller. In case you haven't heard about cronuts, they are a croissant/doughnut hybrid developed at the Dominique Ansel Bakery in New York City that took the pastry scene by storm. News reports show lines of folks willing to pay \$5 each for the distinctive pastry and the bakery only makes 250-300 of them a day. Based on my informal survey of high-profile local bakeries, there are currently no cronuts in Austin; turns out the pastry for sale at the H-E-B is a sugar-coated "croissant doughnut" and not like the NYC original at all. Bakery owners Jim Murphy (Sweetish Hill), Stephanie Schuster (Upper Crust), and Art Silver (Quack's 43rd Street Bakery) said they haven't noticed a groundswell of Austin customers demanding cronuts. And although all three shops produce the laminated pastry dough necessary for croissants every day, none of them is likely to produce cronuts because they aren't equipped with deep fryers.

In other local bakery news, when the new **Wheatsville Food Co-op** (4001 S. Lamar) opens later this year, it will be equipped with its own scratch bakery. Wheatsville bakery supervisor **Robin Roosa** spent some time this summer at the Wild Oats Market in Williamstown, Mass., getting ideas from their artisanal bread program to bring back here. The store opening is now slated for early fall.

Now a lightning round of news on the local restaurant horizon: It's looking as if Edgar and Christina Torres' long-awaited School House Pub (2207 Manor Rd.) should finally open next week, and there's great progress being made just up the street on the building that will be Havmaker (2310 Manor Rd)... We've also heard from the owners of Zed's (501 Canyon Ridge) that their bar expansion and dining room remodel is finally in progress and they've hired a new chef; the plan is to reopen in early October... A restaurant called **Olamaie**, featuring "modern Southern cuisine," is what's up next for the cottage at 1610 San Antonio. In anticipation of their opening later this year, Olamaie chefs Michael Fojtasek and Grae Nonas are hosting a series of popup dinners at restaurants in Austin and Dallas, the first of which runs Aug. 6-10 at Lenoir; see more information on the popup schedule at www.olamaieaustin.com... Fishmonger Roberto San Miguel and chef Shane Stark are partnering on a new, casual, fresh seafood restaurant and market called **Pelagic Fish Market** (2401 E. Cesar Chavez) in the vicinity of Counter Culture and Juan in a Million. They hope to be selling an affordably priced Gulf seafood menu there by early 2014.

## **Craft Beer Is Their Creed**

Forget 'ladies who lunch' - it's ladies who like lager at BitchBeer.org

There are a couple of tried-and-true ways for women to get Internet-famous: showing lots of boobs, as in a leaked sex tape, or the longer slog of consistently producing high quality, useful, and/or hilarious content. Though they count 14 breasts among them, the seven bloggers behind BitchBeer.org chose the way of words and have been rewarded with a legion of fans and a book deal with the History Press, the same publisher behind recent releases The Austin Food Blogger Alliance Cookbook and Austin Breakfast Tacos.

"Bitch Beer" isn't swaggering selfdescription. The blog's name actually refers to the sweet drinks that college-age men sometimes derisively think female guests want to drink instead of, say, a Coors. Mike's Hard Lemonade, for example, might be called "bitch beer."

Well, if "bitch beer" is what girls drink, then these women are working to reclaim the term to include craft beer like Live Oak HefeWeizen – "a gateway beer you'll drink your whole life," Bitch Beer cofounder Caroline Wallace calls it.

"I took a growler of it to a party the other night and drank from it all night," says Kat McCullough, an aspiring stagehand moving to Seattle next month. "I don't think people look at me and think, 'Oh, I bet she drinks a lot of craft beer.' I think they look at me and think, 'She's young and probably parties too much." The Bitch Beer crew are all in their twenties, not too far removed from their college partying days at St. Edward's University, where most of them worked on the school's newspaper, Hilltop Views.

"If we hadn't started this, we would've graduated college and wouldn't have seen each other as much as we do. It was a way to maintain our friendship," says Holly Aker. whose day job responsibilities include search engine optimization. "We text every single day."

With a team of six in Austin - Wendy Cawthon blogs from Dallas - you're sure to run into Bitch Beer bloggers at most Austin beer events, so it's easy to see for yourself whether or not they live up to the term "bitch." The first time I met a quorum of them at the Texas Craft Beer Festival, they smiled and sweetly gave me a black Koozie with their distinctive logo - pink lips on a bottle cap. Aker was more like Kate Middleton holding boozy court than a character from Mean Girls.

The voice of the blog, like the women who run it, is decidedly accessible: purposely neither bitchy nor the closest male hophead equivalent, "snobby." "A total beer nerd could read this and still appreciate it and not feel like they're being talked down to or explained to too much," says Wallace, who works in video production. "But someone who's totally new to beer could read it and have it not be over their head."

"And we're a little snarky," adds Sarah Wood, the only one of the team who went to college at Texas State. (In addition to writing, she also designs for the site.)

The concept is working. The blog is only a year and a half old, but they started getting press credentials for the Great American Beer Festival in Colorado last year and sold out the 125 tickets on sale to

their anniversary party at Rogness Brewing Company. They've appeared on Beer Diaries, the Austin-based Web series, and on PBS. And, of course, every blogger's dream: the book deal.

The path toward publishing began fatefully when Bitch Beer cofounder Shaun Martin was hired to design the Austin Food Blogger Alliance Cookbook, which came out this past April. Martin realized that the beer blog she'd started for fun with her girlfriends fit the criteria for membership in the local nonprofit group of bloggers, so the Bitch Beer crew wrote a craft beer vignette for the collection. The publisher liked their section enough to approach them about a book of their own; the History Press already had a precedent profiling a city's beer scene with its 2012 title Houston Beer: A Heady History of Brewing in the Bayou City by Ronnie Crocker of the Houston Chronicle.

For the past four months, the seven bloggers have packed in writing, research, and more than 60 interviews for Austin Beer: Capital City History on Tap (set for a September release) on top of their day jobs, regular Bitch Beer events, and the blogging schedule. The book's scope spans from pre-Prohibition Austin through the recent boom and on to breweries working to open in the near future. Says Christen Thompson, commissioning editor at the History Press: "Being connected to Austin, it was just so great to read their drafts and time after time have that

great 'No way! I didn't know

that was there!' feeling."

The task of putting down for posterity a local industry in flux wasn't always easy. "My chapter is breweries in 2001 to 2008, and they were changing while I was writing," says Aker - incidentally summing up the state of beer in Austin with that one sentence.

The story of the blog's development itself is dynamic history, too.

About six months after starting the site, the Bitch Beer team went to Dallas to cover the Untapped Beer and Music Festival. "People were walking up to us, because we had name tags, and they wanted to meet us," recalls Aker, still in disbelief. "Who me? I'm unemployed!" (She's employed now.)

"So many people we interviewed said they knew the blog. I almost thought they were lying to seem hip," says Wallace. Their Twitter base has grown steadily, so it's plausible many of the North Texas brewers really had heard of them.

In January 2013, Austin Chronicle contributor Kate Thornberry ranked BitchBeer.org among the Top 10 Austin food blogs. National attention followed just a month later. While flipping through the program at a Roller Derby bout, the collective was struck by two beer ads putting out very different messages: One, a forceful Lone Star ad, featured a Derby girl crushing a beer can on her forehead, while the other, a South Austin Brewery ad, revolved around a sultry model holding a beer and wearing nothing but a T-shirt and boots with the tagline, "Your Champagne Just Got Jealous!" The bloggers bristled at the ad's not exactly progressive "use of a half naked female to sell beer"; Wallace decided to lay out her complaints in a long post titled "How to alienate female beer drinkers in one easy step."

"The day I posted it, I got text messages from at least three or four guys we know who work in craft breweries," Wallace recalls. "Even men are tired of being advertised to like that." The post went viral, and the comments board lit up with supporters cheering Wallace on and detractors arguing she didn't get the ad's supposed "parody" and accusing her of launching a personal attack on Eva Strangelove, the featured model who also helped develop the ad concept. At the time, Strangelove was hospitalized for an illness, and her husband was trying to raise money online for medical bills.

"We got to see how the rest of the community would come to our support," says Aker. "People came to Beerpulse [the national beer

site] and defended us: 'These girls did not put this woman in the hospital.""

The group doesn't shy away from discussions of sexual politics, however, Aker points out, "We aren't constantly talking about women."

Arianna Auber, who also

covers art events for the Austin American-Statesman, is especially drawn to craft beer's more egalitarian appeal: "People will drink a wine because it's \$65. People will drink beer because it tastes

good, and they know the person who made it."

For Martin, Bitch Beer's raison d'être is gender-neutral: "It's about being women excited about beer and wanting to get other people who aren't excited about beer excited, whether they're men or women or young people."

And they're taking that message on the road. Now that they've turned their book in to their editor, the women are planning an upcoming trip to the Great American Beer Festival in Denver, Colo. They're driving rather than flying specifically to bring back more bottles to share - part of their ongoing mission to spread the good word of craft beer far and wide. "We should just rent a U-Haul," Wood laughs.











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






## **Blood** in the Water

#### 'BLACKFISH' IS A WHALE OF A NIGHTMARE FOR SEAWORLD'S PR DEPARTMENT

John Hargrove is used to blowing a whistle. He spent nearly two decades as one of SeaWorld's elite; a killer whale trainer, he'd worked with whales in San Antonio, San Diego, and France. "I began and ended my SeaWorld career in the Texas park," he said. Then, last August, he walked away and became a different kind of whistleblower – as one of the former trainers exposing the reality of life for captive orcas in the new documentary *Blackfish*. He said, "It's a way for me to care for those whales I left behind."

Blackfish takes as its starting point the 2010 death of SeaWorld Florida veteran trainer Dawn Brancheau. She was no know mauled by Tilikum, the biggest captive male orca in the world. 'You just What was truly shocking was that this was the third human about he death in which he was involved. Director Gabriela Cowperthwaite never paints Tilikum as a murderous monster. Instead, she portrays him as the inevitable result of an industry that takes animals whose natural habitat is the oceans and traps them in glorified bath-

tat is the oceans and traps them in glorified bathtubs. The end result is six tons of psychologically and physically scarred whale. There are currently 45 orcas kept in similarly unnatural conditions, and many have been involved in attacks on one another or their trainers.

Even as one of SeaWorld's most experienced staff, Hargrove described himself as "a thorn in management's side. I would speak up and say, 'You cannot treat this whale like a baby machine, you cannot take this calf from her mother, you can't put this whale in a med pool, which is only eight feet deep, for show reasons.'" Not that it did him or the whales much good. He said, "All that ever happened to me was that I'd get in trouble. The running joke was, 'Oh, John's in another closed-door meeting.'"

But two decades is a long time to be a part of an industry you hate. For Hargrove, it finally came down to one animal: Takara. Hargrove had worked with her in California, and he was there when, at 13, she was separated from her mother, Kasatka. He said, "It was such a traumatic experience for Kasatka that we had to put her on medication." Takara gave birth to two calves and was separated from both as she was shipped across the country to Florida and then San Antonio,

where she finally reunited with Hargrove. He said, "I'm so careful not to throw around anthropomorphic terms, but I can tell you without a doubt that her spirit was broken." Even though he hated his job – and hated San Antonio even more – "I stuck around because I felt like I gave her California back, and she gave me California back," he explained. "I just felt like I could not abandon her."

It took a combination of knee injuries and SeaWorld's response to Brancheau's death to finally make him quit. He said, "When they testified in the OSHA hearings that they had no knowledge that we even had a dangerous job, I thought, 'You just can't stay anymore.'" Yet it was still tough to talk about his experiences because he feared that the story and the animals would be exploited even more. "I felt like if I talked to the wrong journalist and they just wanted to concen-

trate on the sensational part of the story, that was going to happen," he said. Then his friend Tim Zimmermann of *Outside* magazine put him in contact with Cowperthwaite, and she interviewed him one week after he quit. As she started asking him questions, she started crying even before she heard his answers. Hargrove said, "I knew then I'd

made the right decision."

There's real fury in the voices of Hargrove and his fellow former trainers as they discuss how SeaWorld attempted to blame Brancheau for her own death, but that's merely one incident in the long history of killer whale attacks and accidents - most of which have been kept out of the media spotlight. That's why he has taken his quest public. He said, "If you won't listen to your most experienced trainers, as soon as your image starts to get damaged, your PR machine kicks into overdrive and you're going to make the changes to try to save face." Hargrove does not expect SeaWorld to suddenly turn their back on the orca industry. "This is about forcing them to take the next step," he said. "If anything I say or anyone says puts pressure on them, and they build bigger and better facilities for the whales, or they stop their breeding program, especially artificial insemination, then that's my goal." And maybe, just maybe, that will help Takara. Until then, he said: "She's stuck. She has no choice. She has to stay in that pool."

## **Lady Be Good**

## AUSTIN FILM SOCIETY PRESENTS PRE-CODE BARBARA STANWYCK

The great Barbara Stanwyck starred in seven different films with the word "lady" in the title, but in truth she was really more of a dame – "a tough old broad from Brooklyn," in her own words – whose most enduring roles were defined by shrewdness and unsentimentality: Double Indemnity's cold-blooded femme fatale, the nightclub chanteuse dropping street smarts on Gary Cooper's egghead professor in Ball of Fire, the professional scam artist who hooks Henry Fonda in Preston Sturges' peerless The Lady Eve.

Born Ruby Stevens and orphaned young, she supported herself as a Ziegfeld girl while still in her teens; she washed up on the West Coast as a 21-year-old bride, married to an abusive vaudevillian whose career hers would quickly surpass (rumor has it their marriage was the inspiration for 1937's A Star Is Born, directed by Stanwyck's five-time collaborator William A. Wellman). That bootstrap beginning – not to mention the Brooklyn accent – inflected Stanwyck's very first performances on film in the late Twenties, just a few short years before the restrictive Production Code went into effect and endeavored to wipe all the sex, drugs, and other fun stuff from Hollywood pictures.

The latest Essential Cinema series from the Austin Film Society unearths four lesser-seen Stanwyck films that make the most of the pre-Code period; at the series kickoff on Aug. 6, University of Texas film professor Charles Ramírez Berg will deliver a special introduction and post-film talk about Stanwyck's career and the Code context. The ultra-rare Mexicali Rose - only Stanwyck's third appearance on camera – casts the still-baby-faced actress as "a heartless coquette." It wouldn't be her last part breaking hearts: In Howard Bretherton and William Keighley's deliciously high-strung women-in-prison picture, 1933's Ladies They Talk About, Stanwyck plays a gun moll sent to jail by a do-gooder beau who pledges his love even after she takes a shot at him. Rounding out the series are 1931's Night Nurse, notable for contriving multiple ways to get Stanwyck stripped down to her delicates and costarring a very young Clark Gable as a murderous chauffeur, and The Miracle Woman, a Frank Capra tent - Kimberley Jones revival sudser from the same year.

## By the People, for the People

It started on a mountain, and now it's over the hill: channelAustin is turning 40

Forty years ago, there was no YouTube. There was no iMovie. And suggesting that video cameras could be built inside phones the size of wallets would probably get you committed.

There was, in short, almost no way for the general public to produce and distribute video to a wide audience. Not part of the networks? Sorry, not part of "the media."

But 40 years ago was also the beginning of Austin's community access television (ACTV), the one place where "viewers like you" could shoot, produce, and show their own work. Despite the now-ubiquitous culture of DIY film production, Austin's eclectic community TV project is still around and still making an impact.

It's been through several name changes, seen its share of controversy, and faces continuous threats of extinction. So in honor of this impressive feat of longevity, the current incarnation, channelAustin, is hosting a three-day birthday bash. After all this time, it certainly deserves a celebration.

"This place originally started as the people's voice [and it's] been a phenomenal incubator for talent," said Executive Director Linda Litowsky. "It's a place where indie filmmakers and bloggers and musicians and videographers and film producers all came to actually get their hands on highend professional equipment either for free or very inexpensively."

The East Austin studio, specially renovated with the help of \$1 million from the city in 2009, is a mecca for anyone interested in moving pictures. The facility includes a room packed with top-of-the-line computers with the latest movie-editing software and two mini-studios. Then there's the main studio itself, a massive soundproof room complete with a rig - and history - to rival those of professional TV news operations. Brian Blake, channelAustin's IT director, has seen it all: a full jazz orchestra, a pirate ship, you name it. Then, there are the numerous programs hosted in the studio - panel discussions, community forums, cooking shows, impossible-to-categorize oddities.

All told, channelAustin runs about 500 hours of content a week, about 100-200 of which are brand spanking new.

It's a long way from the community television station's inception 40 years ago.

#### Pilot Program

ACTV began thanks in part to Federal Communications Commission rules put in place in the early Seventies that required cable companies to offer free channels for the use of the community. With a city grant of \$600, the first broadcast was something straight out of a guerrilla army's handbook. On Aug. 1, 1973, a group of University of Texas students drove up to Mt. Larson, where Austin's broadcast towers were stationed, and simply plugged their lo-fi equipment directly



into the signal box. The footage of that day is used in the soon-to-premiere documentary Access This. And the "broadcast" really is quite something: nothing more than a few people sitting cross-legged on the ground, handing off a small microphone that's attached to a shaky camera. Things only got better (and then a little worse) from there.

The station produced untold hours of community events. As the newbies became veterans, more and more Austinites began creating their own unique programs as varied as an entire cable network's 100-channel package. By 1998, ACTV was operating three stations and worked with a \$650,000 budget. And it certainly was the "incubator of talent" Litowsky described: Two of Austin's favorite sons, Robert Rodriguez and Richard Linklater, both launched their film careers with the production tools at ACTV.

Linklater famously edited and converted his 1991 classic, Slacker, at the old ACTV station. He also used all the free equipment he could. But ACTV had much more than just professional-grade gadgets.

"The bigger thing is that it was such an eye-opener for Austin," Linklater said. "I'd come from a little town in East Texas, and there was nothing remotely like that. You know, I'm kind of the arty-farty film guy, but next to me was the gamut of Austinites."

One look at the community channel's shows - then and now - only underlines this wild mix of programming. One of the most popular shows is the long-running, multi-platform Atheist Experience, which airs the same day as locally televised church services. Then there was David Haun's Carmen Banana Show. For the "family-oriented" program, Haun cheerily dressed as slightly strung-out, freakishly breasted Carmen Miranda and had all sorts of fun. Linklater can't forget the one guy who did a show about mules.

"Just mules. I think the name of the show was called Mules Today," laughed Linklater. "And then there was hardcore political stuff and the religious stuff. There [were] young freaks making crazy music videos. It was an odd little mixture of what Austin is, and only because Austin itself had created this big sandbox for Austinites to express themselves."

Speaking of hardcore political stuff, conspirator extraordinaire Alex Jones also got his start at ACTV in the mid-Nineties. In the Access This documentary, Jones attributes his entire career to his start at ACTV. Perhaps just as significantly, "he met his wife here," said Litowsky.

#### Dead Air

It hasn't always been fun and exuberance, though. The station ran into some serious money and personnel problems between 2003 and 2005. In the end, ACTV Executive Director John Villarreal (who'd renamed the station Austin Community Access Center) was convicted of embezzling \$354,000 from the station. Since it was funded both publicly and through \$1.3 million from Time Warner Cable as part of a franchise contract with the city, ACTV faced increased scrutiny. It was a rough time for ACTV, and part of the reason it's gone through a few name changes.

After the embezzling debacle, "we came in as Public Access Community Television. PACT, to get away from the ACA stigma," said Litowsky. Then "we changed our name from PACT, which kind of sucked and was really boring, to channelAustin, because we believe we channel everything Austin."

But channelAustin took another hit in 2011, when the city ended its franchise agreement with the cable companies and cost the network about 30% of its funding. What was once an operation with 14 fulltime staff members and open 86 hours a week to the public is now down to eight staff members and open only 40 public hours. Their budget is about \$520,000 a year, 20% of which comes from donations.

"Funding will always be a challenge for every nonprofit," Litowsky said. "And I think realistically speaking, it's important to make sure our community realizes that we're here and understands the value and the relevance of a community media center like this."

#### **Sense of Community**

Then of course, there's the YouTube era. Where ambitious young filmmakers once faced expensive startup costs and few accessible mediums, cheap cameras and omnipresent video sites have significantly decreased the individual auteur's need for facilities like channelAustin. It still has some of the finest editing software available to the public, but the station now serves slightly different needs.

"This place has kind of now come full circle," Litowsky said. "Instead of being so much about the individual ... it's kind of about the community; it's about nonprofit organizations that may not have access to the high-level technology and the tools."

Apart from channelAustin's youth program, channelAustin also helps local momand-pop shops with promotional work. But perhaps the best examples of channelAustin's community outreach? Thanks to the channelAustin efforts of Sohn Lee and his family, the area's large Korean community has access to local, relatable programming. Since 2000, Lee has produced three shows on channelAustin, all of which focus on Korean worship, news, and current events.


"The Korean community is a tight-knit community and [Mr. Lee] frequently has people come up to him and thank him for having the Korean programs available," said Lee's daughter, Tina, who helps him with the projects. "Quite often, we even get letters and emails from viewers that are non-Korean. And it's really heartwarming to see that, because some people will write, 'I do not understand what you guys are saying but the music is entertaining."

For Litowsky and the rest of the channelAustin crew, that uniting of a local community is what keeps them excited about public access television, even in the face of various uncertainties.

"Regardless of YouTube," Litowsky said, "everything about this place is about its community. It's for the community, by the community. And I think no matter what ... we will always stand for that."

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#### As development encroaches on the Broken Spoke, rest assured there will never be another like it

"Quick! Quick! Slooow."

About five dozen men and women bootscoot across the sawdust-free dance floor of the Broken Spoke early on this summer Saturday night, led by Terry White, one of the owner's two daughters. Couples spin counterclockwise in varying degrees of proficiency, clumsy but good-hearted shuffling and stumbling.

"Don't pick your feet up!"

White's a petite, fiftysomething platinum blonde with a perpetual tan and a Madonnastyle headset in her spiky hair. She sasses instructions with the authority of a drill instructor, striding across the floor, looking at feet and positions, and encouraging the occasional couple not to be terrified of the two-step.

"I once taught 45 Korean men to dance," White assures a tentative twosome as she adjusts the man's arm on his partner's lower back. "No women."

By the time the instructor wraps her lesson, Alvin Crow tunes his fiddle for his band's first set of the night.

In almost any other club, dance lessons might be considered a gimmick. At the Broken Spoke, it's tradition - for locals, tourists, and celebrities alike. White had no compunction about correcting Robert Plant's form, for instance. And yet, country dancing seems to be a nearly extinct tradition, even

as a no-brainer in cultivating future generations of audiences. Not that it's any defense against property development.

That's the cloud looming over the Broken Spoke ever since the inevitable upscaling of South Lamar began in earnest last decade. Since the venue doesn't own the site, it's at the mercy of the landowners around it. Plans and promises have a way of vanishing in the face of progress.

#### Where Do You Come From. **Cotton-Eved Joe?**

Popular music as a live commodity remains a relatively recent advancement, only as old as recorded music itself. Before vocal microphones, most music was listened to or danced to as instrumentals, since musicians drowned out the singers. Vocalists coming to the fore also provided marquee names for the public to seek out.

Huge technological advances in the wake of both world wars last century saw developments as staggering as today's: radio, recordings, film. In the Forties, waves of people moved to the city, which offered better jobs and pay. Many took to the urban lifestyle and enjoyed the new sounds of jazz and big band, while still loving the country, folk, Western, and bluegrass they'd been raised on in more rural settings.

That was especially true in Texas, where dance halls were as much a part of city life as country life. It was a life James White wanted when he opened the Broken Spoke at 3201 S. Lamar in 1964. While the world famous honky-tonk sits inside the city limits now, White likes pointing out that it was outside town when it opened.

"Bob Wills walked through that front door wearing a cowboy hat and smoking a cigar with his fiddle under his arm."

That's one of White's favorite anecdotes. Along with booking the king of Western swing in 1965, he's quick to rattle off the club's greatest hits: Ernest Tubb, Willie Nelson, Dolly Parton. Two dusty rooms just off the dance floor house a museum of Austin country music according to the Spoke.

"I booked Alvin Crow in 1973, same year Freda & the Firedogs played here - Marcia Ball's band," recalls White about the capital's seminal cosmic cowboy days. "Freda & the Firedogs came in to play a benefit for Lloyd Doggett and drew 500 people. I figured any hippie band that could draw 500 people to a fundraiser, I better get back. Then along come Asleep at the Wheel after that, Doug Sahm. Gary P. Nunn, too."


The Spoke played a crucial role in the development of progressive country in the early Seventies, booking nontraditional bands alongside traditional idols. The opposite was true at such clubs as Soap Creek, Antone's, and the Armadillo, which were counterculture venues catering to hip youth by booking elderly bluesmen, aging folkies, and country legends. The Broken Spoke stood for traditional country values, and the twain didn't always meet.

"We had a lot of rednecks and cowboys here, and they resented the longhairs coming out in their Roman sandals," chuckles White. "I got a kick out of the way the hippies dressed."

Crow found himself with a booking conflict in 1975, and recommended White hire a San Marcos act called Ace in the Hole. White took a shine to the band and their handsome, affable singer - George Strait. They played weekly at the venue for seven years, making their reputation at a place that a few years later resisted the urge to go urban cowboy and stuck with locals.

#### ¡Viva Terlingua!

Like legions before him, Jeff Hughes arrived in Austin for its university (where he roomed with Fastball's Miles Zuniga), but found his calling behind a guitar. When he started playing in the Eighties, Hughes looked up to the Wagoneers, who helped rally the decade's trad country movement

as embodied by Dwight Yoakam. Hughes' subsequent genre upstarts, Chaparral, became a running favorite at the Spoke, and today holds down a regular slot.

"[Wagoneers frontman] Monte Warden was a big supporter and introduced me to [Soap Creek owner] Carlyne Majer, who published a couple of my songs and gave me some walking-around money," recalls Hughes, connecting the dots to his career. "I dove into the punk rock scene when I got here, and you can't deny all those influences. But Jerry Jeff Walker is the reason I play guitar. One year, we played that Terlingua album all summer long."

Like veteran, local draws Dale Watson, the Derailers, and Cornell Hurd, Jesse

Dayton pulls in a Spoke crowd as much there to see him as they are to dance. Dayton's tough image, won by playing for Johnny Cash and Waylon Jennings, among others, puts him comfortably in the dance hall's Thursday night spot. He's no less at home working with Rob Zombie on horror movie and music projects.

"I left a Rob Zombie tour twice in the middle of the tour to come back here and [play my slot]," attests the guitarist-singer. "People were like, 'Where are you

going?' And I was like, 'I have to play the Broken Spoke.' They didn't understand.

"James is understanding, but somebody'll take my gig if I don't go back! And if you don't keep them on the dance floor, you don't keep the gig."

On a Saturday night like tonight, with Alvin Crow as bandleader, it's a history lesson. His band of gypsy journeymen - guitarist John X. Reed, steel player Herb Steiner, bassist Jason Crow, and muscle drummer John Chandler - swing, sway, shake, and weep. Crow's first set incorporates a swath of Texas country from Bob Wills to Doug Sahm. Ernest Tubb's tender favorite "Waltz Across Texas" works its storybook charms as if for the first time.

#### SoLa, SoFi, BroSpo

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South Lamar's ongoing facelift begins as far back as the Nineties, around the time First Thursdays started up on South Congress. Both South Lamar and South First carry over the hipster SoCo vibe with their own nicknames of SoLa and SoFi. That's good for most businesses, but keeping the Spoke rolling doesn't require the latest in drinks or fashion.

While James White defines figurehead, "In charge of BS and PR," he jokes, most agree that his wife Annetta cracks the whip on the

> Spoke. Born and raised in Austin – the couple both graduated from Travis High School – Annetta's a no-nonsense blonde with bright blue-green eyes. Her recipes built the Spoke's beloved menu and when it comes to expressing opinions, duck.

"I can't believe that the city would let a business like us that's paid their taxes, never been late, done what we're supposed to, been good citizens, and they won't give us an entrance to our own business? They stood on my porch and said it was a

'shared entrance.' Shared, my foot!"

One day, when Annetta White drove in to find her new "shared" driveway completely blocked, she did the natural thing.

"I blocked them in."

For most of its 50 years, the barn-red dance hall stood unattached in a parking lot with two pickup-truck wide entrances and 360-degree access around the club for parking on any side of it. That included an unlit field that invited all manner of revelry, fistfights, and mischief - not to mention actual parking - and a band load-in area that used to be dirt

#### **BUS STOP**

What the hell happened to the old tour bus parked outside the Spoke?

"That was a 1948 Flxible bus," explains James White. "I'd booked the Texas Top Hands in the Sixties, when Easy Adams was the bandleader. His claim to fame was writing the 'Bandera Waltz.' They played country, cowboy, Western music.

"About 14 years ago, Ray Sczepanik from the band gave me that bus. I went to San Antone and it was sitting in a field by his house. I thought the wheels were flat, they were so sunk in the dirt. The neighborhood kids had shot out the windows and I took it like that. We shook hands and I loaded up the bus for Austin.

"Ray would come by every three or four years and say, 'Why don't you put a canopy over it?' He came by another time and said something about the windows, and I told him



the developers would pay for the windows and tires to be fixed.

"In 2012, we towed the bus to a body shop in Buda and fixed all the windows and tires and touched it up some. I don't think Ray realized people like it funky, not bright and shiny. We got it back here for South by Southwest. It stood out there less than a

month until I came here one morning and it was gone."

That was March 24, when shots started being traded across the river, so to speak, stoking the longsimmering feud between the San Antonio and Austin music scenes. Yet neither Ray Sczepanik nor James White wear the black villain hat here. More likely it's poor communication, economics, and a little boot-dragging by both men, who've known each other for decades, that's led to the showdown.

Ray Sczepanik took over the Texas Top Hands in 1979, having joined them in 1967. Formed in 1945, they were already veterans, starring in a Western titled Echo Ranch, and touring with Tex Ritter, Hopalong Cassidy, Gene Autry, and Hank Williams. Sczepanik worked closely with bandleader Easy Adams in the middle years, and when Adams handed off the band to him, the bus came with it. The Texas Western Swing Hall of Fame inducted the group in 1992.

Sczepanik, who holds the title to the vehicle, seems quite content with its current location in Adkins, a largely undeveloped area east of San Antonio off Loop 1604. The bus now sits under a roof, that of a 17,000-squarefoot barbecue joint, dance hall, and tourist attraction. Another rustic photo op for another locale?

"I loved that bus," sighs James White. - M.M.

and grass and now has a sidewalk and fencing. That you can't drive around the Spoke anymore was an expected inconvenience.

"But everything in the front was supposed to stay the same," complains James. "I wanted my dirt parking lot. I don't want no damn sidewalk. I had to move the sign. Had to move the Texas Top Hands bus, and to me, that led to it getting stolen [see sidebar]. I didn't like the big corral around the oak tree. There hasn't been a fence around that tree in 50 years. It's overkill.

"I don't really even have an entrance of my own now. I share it with the apartments next door, and this afternoon at 3:30pm, I come here and a forklift is blocking the driveway. They took my [south] entrance, and they put a fence in front of my delivery gate. The beer trucks and band people, they gotta deal with all that.

"I need at least two entrances. The service station down the road has four entrances. We've got half an entrance. The Broken Spoke has been here longer than any other business. All these other businesses came after us. This was the county back then. with the city around it. That's why I got to build the Spoke the way I wanted to. The city of Austin told me, 'Rest assured, there'll never be another Broken Spoke."

#### Don't It Make You **Wanna Dance**

Ginny White Peacock stands behind the bar amidst the Saturday night hubbub counting change and looking completely unruffled. Drinks made, beers poured, food cooked, tables served, tables bussed, tabs paid - this will be a typical night at the Broken Spoke and she's got it under control. With her sweet face and warm smile, James and Annetta White's youngest daughter is the definition of Texas hospitality while being an efficient manager, one of several jobs she juggles at the bar she grew up in. James Lamar White Peacock, her son, may one day greet guests at the dance hall door like his grandfather.

"It breaks my heart," confesses Jessie Mathieson, a five-year employee of the Spoke. "We do our best to keep the integrity inside these walls, but when you can't drive into our parking lot or have to walk through development just to get to the front door, it's changed the character of the place."

James White plays it typically politic. "I say this is like coming to the Alamo, with all those big buildings around it.

"By November, we'll get access to the parking and a walkway across Lamar with a red light. They say they're gonna start leasing apartments here by August. There's gonna be 300 apartments, half are double occupancy, so you got around 500 people plus retail space and visitors.

"I'm looking forward to it being done and completed so I can see how many people I can lure over here to the Broken Spoke. Hopefully, they all like chicken-fried steak and country music."

And if they don't know how to two-step, Terry White can teach 'em.

"I can't believe that the city would let a business like us that's paid their taxes, never been late, done what we're supposed to, been good citizens, and they won't give us an entrance to our own business? #### **ANNALS OF INVENTION**

Although Khalid Sheikh Mohammed (the alleged 9/11 mastermind) was waterboarded 183 times among several extreme interrogation techniques, he and his CIA captors eventually reached a moderated state. In 2003, though still housed in a "black site" in Romania, "KSM" asked permission to design a household vacuum cleaner, and the highest echelons of the agency cooperated, according to a former senior CIA analyst, speaking to the Associated Press in July. Marketing Challenges: 1) The Rocket Fizz Soda Pop and Candy Shop franchisers, already with a lineup of sometimes-unappreciated flavors such as buffalo-chicken-wing soda, briefly experimented in June with "ranch dressing" soda, a mistaken adventure that co-founder Rob Powells jokingly blamed on his business partner. 2) Brewmaster John Maier of Rogue Ales in Newport, Ore., pointed out that "wild yeasts" have been used in beer for centuries and thus (according to a June report on FoodBeast.com) his company's Beard Beer (from yeast of beards, including at one time, his own) should be regarded as a traditional brew.

#### **SCIENCE ON THE CUTTING EDGE**

Carnivorous Vegetation: It was a special occasion in Surrey, England, in June as a rare plant prepared to bloom. The three-foot-tall *Puya chilensis*, native to Chile, features neon-bright greenish-yellow flowers with blooms large enough to yield drinkable nectar, but its most startling distinction is its ability to nourish itself by trapping small animals in its razor-sharp spines, leaving them to decay. (At Britain's Wisley Garden, it is fed with ordinary fertilizer rather than animals.)

Too Much Information: During a June debate in a House Rules Committee hearing on abortion legislation, U.S. Rep. Michael Burgess of Texas, himself an obstetrician/gynecologist, criticized a proposal to outlaw abortion at the 20-week limit (where a fetus is said to begin to feel pain), insisting on an earlier ban, at 15 or 16 weeks. "Watch a sonogram of a 15-week-old baby," said Burgess, "and they have movements that are purposeful. ... if they're a male baby, they may have their hand between their legs." Thus, "If they feel pleasure, why is it so hard to think that they could feel pain?"

Physicians at Kwong Wah Hospital and Queen Elizabeth Hospital, publishing in the Hong Kong Medical Journal recently, described a 66-year-old man seeking relief from a swelling in his abdomen (after having had a sparse history with doctors). They concluded that the man was basically a woman and that the cause of the swelling was an ovarian cyst. The patient had both Turner syndrome, which causes women to lack some female features, and congenital adrenal hyperplasia, which boosts male hormones. (While females have two X chromosomes, and males an X and a Y, Turner syndrome patients have one X and no Y.)

Alarming Headlines: 1) "Koala Chlamydia: The STD Threatening an Australian Icon" (BBC News). 2) "Super-Sized Crabs and Oysters With Herpes" (Field & Stream). 3) "Far-Right Extremists Chased Through London by Women Dressed as Badgers" (International Business Times, reporting June rallies of two British nationalist parties and their opposition occurring at the same time and place as a better-attended demonstration against the government's cull on badgers).

Horse Bullies: In June, Barbour County, W.Va., firefighters, called to a farm in Belington, rescued the horse "Rowdy," whose entire body was somehow trapped inside an industrial-sized tire. Rowdy's owner said she believes Rowdy had an altercation with some of the other horses.

#### **PEOPLE DIFFERENT FROM US**

Melanie Typaldos, 57, and her husband, Richard Loveman, 54, in Buda, Texas, are supposedly part of a growing trend of people keeping pet capybaras (giant, semiaquatic guinea pigs that are the world's largest rodents, at more than 100 pounds). "Gary" sometimes lounges on the couple's marital bed and frolics in the aboveground pool the couple installed for him. Although Melanie and Richard keep other, more traditional animals at their home (they told London's *Daily Mail* in June), Gary is, of course, the only one as large as a human and with the distinctive body and head of a rat.

1) Apprentice Brooklyn, N.Y., tree-trimmer David Fleischer, 21 (and son of the company owner), had to be rescued by firefighters in July after he apparently violated the cardinal rule in the business by cutting lower branches first – until he was stranded at the top of the tree. "He is a good boy," said "Izzy" Fleischer, "but he is learning." 2) Emergency crews in Fort Worth, Texas, responded to a Quik Trip gas station in June when an unidentified man got his finger caught in his car's gas cap after he poured in some additive. "Let me hear you!" bellowed Ozzy Osbourne behind the black scrim boxing of the Erwin Center stage. The house lights hadn't gone down, but the air-raid sirens went up, and so did the critical mass. In the gloom, Geezer Butler climbed the stairs stage left and Tony Iommi ascended stage right. Then began "War Pigs." For the next two hours, that spearheading folk-blues detonation – as damning today as when it was written in 1970, and doubtlessly carrying forward in its commentary on mankind - became a wake that sent one tsunami after another through a music canon as familiar as the characters in a Hollywood classic: Tony lommi, the epitome of metal cool, in a leather frock coat, sunglasses, and trademark silver cross hanging on his chest, scrubbing massive, biting riffs from his collection of Gibson SGs; Geezer Butler, fingers flying across four strings in the anchoring of his bandmate's riffology; and Osbourne, his range gone but looking two-thirds his age shuffling around the stage, sing-



ing mostly in the key of Q and exhorting the brimming Red River drum to make itself heard. Drummer Tommy Clufetos, standing in for a recalcitrant Bill Ward, was there in a purely support capacity, despite an overlong drum solo at the end of "Rat Salad." Performing in front of a minimalist Hammer Films horror backdrop and three video screens, Black Sabbath thus unearthed hidden

gems as well as the best of its new LP, 13. "Age of Reason" and "God Is Dead?" filled the Erwin Center as monstrously as "Behind the Wall of Sleep" and Butler showcase "N.I.B.," while "Methademic" soared like a Pteranodon instead of stomping like a Brontosaurus. Ultimately, though, it was the early Tyrannosaurus hits - big and raw - that drew the reddest blood and the shrillest screams. With lommi, 65, playing like a man not battling lymphoma; Butler, 64, keeping the groove aflame; and Osbourne, 64, doing, well, his best, "Children of the Grave," "Into the Void," and especially "Black Sabbath" - the tritone that altered popular music - invented heavy metal right before your ears. Even 40 years on.





Seventies, the term "heavy metal" wasn't in wide use vet, and neither were its signifiers. Thus guitarist Richie Wise (a producer for Kiss), bassist Kenny Aaronson (drummer for everyone from Bob Dylan to Hall & Oates), and drummer Marc Bell (later Marky Ramone)



#### High On Fire Spitting Fire Live Vol. 1 & 2 (eOne)

A two-volume live release feels like a formality for stoner thrash beast High On

Fire, given that the Oakland trio's studio work maintains such crushing immediacy. Spitting Fire draws from every prior LP, reveling in Matt Pike's crusty growl, relentless riffs, and jackhammer guitar. Despite set list guibbles (no "Blessed Black Wings"?), the performances atomize neurons with brutal consistency and high-volume intensity. ★★★

#### Horseback A Plague of Knowing (Relapse)


Also of alt.country act Mount Moriah, Chapel Hill, N.C., mad scientist Jenks

Miller carefully recombines Southern rock, psychedelic ambience, and black metal, proclaiming "It's alive!" over the corpus of a quirky but graceful monster. Three hours of demos, outtakes, live cuts, and other ephemera collected on three discs include everything from ersatz synth themes and dark folk rock to a 42-minute meditation on a single chord. Eccentric, eclectic, and brilliant. \*\*\*\*

#### Kadavar Abra Kadavar (Nuclear Blast)

Pledging fealty to Seventies proto-metal,

German power trio Kadavar's eponymous debut made for retro pleasure. Abra Kadavar, past its groan-inducing title, sounds more fired up and inspired, vibrating with barely-



contained vigor. Sonics remain mired in the

#### Kylesa *Ultraviolet* (Season of Mist)

Kylesa always promised transcendence. The Savannah, Ga., ensemble

never bothered sticking to its initial sludge script, and now prog, psych, and grunge groove together in a wall-shaking shimmer, piercing dissonance giving way to spinecaressing lyricism - sometimes all at once. Bandleaders Phil Cope and Laura Pleasants show off five LPs worth of development, coming into their own on "Unspoken," "Quicksand," and "Grounded," all lessons in following the muse down a path of riff-ripened enlightenment. ★★★

#### Nails **Abandon All Life** (Southern Lord)

In the race to the furthest extremity of metal, Nails nears the finish line. Abandon

All Life pushes its thrashing grindcore so far into the red it paints the walls with blood. A subtle sense of dynamics (cf. "Wide Open Wound") keeps the roar from getting monochromatic, but don't-blink intensity rules here, and Nails hammers it directly into your brain. ★★★

#### Southern Front Seasons of Hate

Austin's Southern Front serves up brutality with a smile on its latest EP. The title track thrashes violently

enough to rend flesh and slaughter souls,

but by the time the local quintet rants about a "Beerzerker," goofy grins sit alongside popping eyes and flying fingers. With a chorus one-half social protest and the other Dada verse, "Pig For Nail" splits the difference with a bloody hatchet. ★★★

#### Tribulation The Formulas of Death (:Ajna:)

Death metal's black hole exerts such a gravitational pull only the strongest acts can avoid its oft-mindnumb-

ing conventions. Enter Tribulation, which achieves escape velocity with its second LP, folding the New Wave of British Heavy Metal, ambient music, and even reggae into its Swedish cauldron. Formulas' 75-minute opus unleashes a tidal sweep that's damn near orchestral, all while retaining the proper blast beats and bipolar vampire vox. In Tribulation's hands, the genre sound less like death than new life. ★★★★

#### Watain The Wild Hunt (Season of Mist/ **Century Media)**

Black metal fights to keep the genre "pure" (lo-fi, three-

chord nastiness), while struggling to evolve. Sweden's Watain lunges forward with acceptable BM dogma without sacrificing its sinister raw power. "De Profundis," "Outlaw" (with its Spanish guitar intro), and snarling single "All That May Bleed" erect angular guitar riffs and swirling arrangements into a skeletal edifice for blood-covered frontman Erik Danielsson to climb vocally like a spider. "They Rode On" saddles up Gothic majesty, while "Sleepless Evil" erupts drillbit guitar. Watain's secret weapon: unusually groove-oriented drums. While no radical rethink, The Wild Hunt boosts black metal up the evolutionary ladder.

















### Day Trips

BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Lubbock Lake National Historic Landmark on the edge of Lubbock holds the record of human history. For more than 75 years it has been an active archaeology site, as scientists uncover the mysteries locked into layers of dirt.

Centuries ago, what we know as the High Plains was a much wetter place. Yellow House Draw, an intermittent tributary to the Brazos River, was fed by ancient springs. Occupation of the site continued from the Paleo-Indians until 1881, when George Singer built a trading post in a grove of trees that became the beginnings of Lubbock.

After the springs dried in the Thirties, the city tried unsuccessfully to dredge a lake in the shallow valley. What they found instead of a water source was the only site in North America with a complete record of 12,000 years of humans, plants, and animals in a single place. Since 1939, the site has been an active archaeological site for scientists from

the Museum of Texas Tech University. The university museum also has a satellite museum at the preserve that illustrates the history of the site. Trails meander through the treeless draw with signs identifying the native plants. Lubbock Lake National Historic Landmark

They say that quarterback's the most demanding position in sports, but even John Elway would marvel at the degree of difficulty facing any wide receiver on a unicycle. "The most difficult part is learning to take a hit and stay on your unicycle," explains Lee Wallace, a veteran of the Unicycle Football League, an eight-team assembly of highly alternative athletes in Austin and San Marcos.



"Someone will hit you going 10 or 15 miles per hour, and you have to just spin or roll or do whatever you can to stay on. ### Blackfish

D: Gabriela Cowperthwaite. (PG-13, 83 min.)

Pair this shocking documentary about the plight of captive killer whales at SeaWorld and similar

faux-oceanic environs with the forthcoming doc *The Act of Killing* (add 2009's *The Cove* if you're feeling especially inhuman) and you might as well just put a bullet in the head of the whole of mankind. Stick a harpoon in us, we're done for.

Cowperthwaite's depressingly unsurprising doc focuses on the ongoing plight of Tilikum, an orca captured as an adolescent off the coast of Iceland and, since then, implicated in a series of aggressive encounters with marine-park employees, which culminated in the death of SeaWorld Orlando trainer Dawn Brancheau. Blackfish's damning core assertion, heavily bolstered by a

roster of former SeaWorld trainers, animal experts, and even one of the fishermen who helped capture infant orcas back in the Seventies, is that these gorgeous,

glossy, black-and-white wonders may be second only to humans in terms of brain capacity, self-awareness, language, and familial ties. (And possibly more human than human in the latter case.) Penning them inside man-made water-worlds with an eye toward entertainment and free enterprise is tantamount to animal cruelty of the highest order. Watching these scarred and possibly psychotic mammals do flips and tricks for the rubes puts you in mind of Charlton Heston's plight in – I'm serious – *Planet of the Apes*, but in this case, the damn dirty bipeds are the owners of SeaWorld and its ilk. Notably,

that corporate entity has objected strenuously to its tawdry depiction in this film, even going so far as to issue a point-by-point rebuttal to the charges Cowperthwaite makes. In turn, the producers of *Blackfish* have offered their own rebuttal to the rebuttal. And so it goes. SeaWorld did itself no favors by refusing to cooperate during the making of the documentary and refusing requests for interviews with the filmmakers, but it's horrific enough to learn that none of the former employees interviewed here were aware of Tilikum's potential for violence or that this particular orca had

been involved in potentially lethal acts prior to the death of Brancheau in 2010. SeaWorld's official response to the incident put the blame squarely on the trainer, or, more accurately, her

ponytail. *Blackfish* systematically, and with great compassion toward all the mammals involved, rips that verdict to shreds, and in the process makes you long for the day when SeaWorld's bottom line is no longer the cause for the functional imprisonment of these awe-inspiring creatures.

Former SeaWorld trainer John Hargrove, featured in the film, will participate in a Q&A via Skype following the 7:30pm screenings on Friday and Saturday. For more on the film, see "Blood in the Water," p.33. 2010 Oscar-winner *The Cove* also returns to the Violet Crown for a one-week companion engagement.

#### THE ATTACK

D: Ziad Doueiri; with Ali Suliman, Reymond Amsalem, Evgenia Dodena, Uri Gavriel, Karim Saleh, Dvir Benedek. (R, 102 min.)

A woman weeps as she says good-bye to her husband at the beginning of The Attack, the latest film from Lebanese filmmaker Ziad Doueiri (West Beirut). Her spouse is moved by her feelings for him as she departs Tel Aviv for a trip to visit her family in Palestine. Still, she will not be at his side when he receives a prestigious medical award in Tel Aviv - the first this Israeli organization has given to an Arab in 41 years, he notes in his address to the gathering. Shortly after the ceremony, a terrorist bomb goes off in in the city, killing 17 people, and the doctor is called back on duty at the hospital. After tending to the surviving victims, the surgeon, Amin (Suliman) is told that all evidence points to the fact that his wife Siham (Amsalem), was the bomber. Identifying her corpse in the morgue, Amin strongly insists that she must have been a victim, not the perpetrator. Amin's known universe no longer makes sense and, after mourning, he begins to investigate.

The first half of this film is a thoughtful and provocative mystery – not so much into the identity of the bomber, but into Palestinian identity as a whole, not to mention a husband's inquiry into the extent to which he really knew his wife. At first, Amin is tortured as a co-conspirator, Guantanamostyle. Yet it's clear he knows nothing of Siham's intentions and beliefs. He is proud of his assimilation into Israeli society, and has no idea that she was not of a like mind. We watch as Amin goes from outrage and

denial to acceptance and puzzlement, and Suliman deftly pulls the audience along in his emotions while appearing in almost every scene.

Around the midway point, however, Amin travels to Palestinian territory to seek answers from Siham's family and various religious leaders. Here, the film turns into a more traditional litany of the well-known problems that have plagued this region of the world for generations. At its best when making the political personal, the film's exposure of a husband's enduring mystery about his wife's motivations has a universal appeal. Answers prove more elusive than the questions. Formerly a cameraman on several of Quentin Tarantino's films, Doueiri knows how to create images that linger. Maybe that's what has caused The Attack to be banned in his home country of Lebanon and elsewhere. - Marjorie Baumgarten Arbor

#### **©** COCKNEYS VS. ZOMBIES

D: Matthias Hoene; with Rasmus Hardiker, Harry Treadaway, Michelle Ryan, Jack Doolan, Georgia King, Ashley Thomas, Alan Ford, Honor Blackman, Richard Briers. (NR, 88 min.)

Like Guy Ritchie meeting George Romero for a bite with *The Living Dead at the Manchester Morgue*, this bloody good zomcom (and Fantastic Fest 2012 favorite) from the UK posits a clash between the undead and the nearly dead to surprisingly guffawinducing effect. In the first two dueling, ultimately converging plot lines, Hardiker and Treadaway are Terry and Andy, a pair of brothers who hatch a bound-to-be-botched bank job in order to save their grandfather's retirement home from the wrecking ball. As fate would have it, their scheme goes utterly awry just as the developer's backhoes unearth a

plague of zombies in East London (shades of Hammer's 1967 classic *Quatermass* and the Pit). The second, and frankly more engaging, story pits the determinedly vital oldsters against the ravening hordes as they barricade themselves in their ramshackle pensioners' retreat.

Scripted by Lucas Roche and James Moran (Tower Block, Severance) with an affectionate eye firmly fixed on the slow-moving but quick-witted golden-agers, Cockneys vs. Zombies quickly overcomes its dull-as-death titling and turns out to be the best zombie yuk-fest since Edgar Wright broke new, unhallowed ground with Shaun of the Dead nearly a decade ago. If it's not quite up to par with the viscera-drenched loopiness of, say, Peter Jackson's Dead Alive, well, really, what is? Zombies have been clogging theatres since the premillennial era, and, of late, have become downright annoying in their prevalence. I'll grant you that they're an artistic outlier indicative of our collective, global anxieties, but must they be so overwhelming in their sheer numbers and clumsy, shambling ineptitude? (The movies, I mean.) What Romero hath wrought has come back to gnaw and gnash a thousandfold and when even Brad Pitt turns up battling the things that go bite in the night, perhaps a cinematic cease-fire is in order. (And this from someone who subscribes to both Fangoria and Video Watchdog.)

Smartly, director Hoene has populated his cast with some stellar Brit-cinema legends, chief among them Alan Ford (*Snatch*'s Brick Top) as Terry and Andy's hardcase grandpa Ray, and Honor Blackman, best known on these shores as Patrick Macnee's original, lethal gal of Sixties cult-TV classic *The Avengers*. Other notables include British

legend Richard Briers as the dotty Hamish, who makes a memorably slow-burning mad dash – via walker, no less – from the equally diminished dead folk. It's fun, gore-drenched, and even touching at times. All that's missing from the toothy chaos and broad comedy on display here is Dame Judi Dench and the kickass title that could have been: *The Best Necrotic Mandible Hotel*.

#### THE SMURFS 2

Does the world need another movie about a bunch of miniature, blue-skinned humanoids with bulbous noses and perky bobtails; gnomelike creatures who wear floppy caps, live in mushrooms, and use the word

"smurf" in every other sentence? Someone apparently thinks so. The 3-D, live-action/ animated film The Smurfs 2 takes up where its wildly successful 2011 predecessor (worldwide gross: \$564 million) left off, as the malevolent magician Gargamel (Azaria) and his feline accomplice Azrael once again scheme to extract mystical Smurf essence in a diabolical plan to rule the world. Aiding and abetting these evildoers are Gargamel's unloved Naughties offspring, Vexy (Ricci) and Hackus (Smoove), two would-be Smurfs who dress like hipsters and talk like stoners. (Yes, we've come a long way from Belgian comics artist Peyo's original vision for his cartoon characters back in 1958.) From an adult's perspective, the narrative makes little sense - the cadre of screenwriters seemingly pulls most of the plot elements out of thin air - but the kids won't mind. They'll find it all perfectly smurfy.

Where the first installment of the franchise largely takes place in New York City, the setting of its successor is the City of Lights, prominently featuring Notre Dame Cathedral, the Eiffel Tower, the Louvre, and the Paris Opera House, where Gargamel nastily waves his magic wand to the perverse delight of packed Parisian audiences every night. (Not surprising when you think of it: After all, the French also love Jerry Lewis.) It's a clever way to introduce youngsters to one of the world's most beautiful cities, made all the more beautiful by the film's stellar production values. And for their parents, the travelogue provides a welcome distraction from the hocus-pocus storyline and the relative absence of subtext, though Vanity (Oliver)- a foppish Smurf who carries a hand mirror and speaks with an affected accent - may strike them as the gayest animated character since the Great Gazoo on The Flintstones.

It's hard to say who comes off better in The Smurfs 2: the animated Smurfs or the human beings with whom they interact. As the balding, orthodontically challenged villain, Azaria appears to be having a ball, though his gleeful badness registers as an inside joke much of the time, which may be intentional. (To Azaria's credit, the bucktooth prosthetic must have been a bitch to wear.) Harris pretty much plays a straight man, though he's given a zinger or two to maintain his reputation. As for the multitude of blue guys (and the single gal, Smurfette, voiced by Perry), they're no Seven Dwarfs, though the sonorous voice of the late Winters in the role of wise Papa Smurf will have old-timers pine for the zaniness that comic genius could inspire in his prime. If only The Smurfs 2 had a smidgen of that madness.

It should come as no surprise that when you start with two guns you might wind up with a complicated and multihanded Mexican standoff by movie's end. Following the hail

of bullets along the way to the fiery conclusion of 2 Guns proves to be an entertainingly escapist journey.

Denzel Washington and Mark Wahlberg find a companionable groove as the film's titular guns (no small feat for Wahlberg, since he's playing against one of the titans of American acting). As the film opens, Washington's Bobby Trench and Wahlberg's "Stig" Stigman appear to be partners in crime setting up a bank robbery in the small, fictional town of Tres Cruces, N.M. What is unknown to the other is that each one is an agent of the law in deep undercover: Bobby is a DEA agent and Stig works for the military as an NCIS officer. Each man's objective is to capture Papi Greco (Olmos), the bullish head of a Mexican drug cartel. The two of them spar for a while, which makes for some physically rollicking scraps. After the bank robbery and the mutual discovery of their true identities, the two men become real partners because the number of their opponents swells dramatically. Earl (Paxton), a particularly smarmy and heartless antagonist, enters the fray, laying sole claim to the stolen millions. By the time Earl's true identity is revealed, the number and depth of U.S. government entities found on this money trail is staggering. In classic form, partners Bobby and Stig become solid buddies by the end of the caper.

Based on the Boom! graphic novels by Steven Grant, 2 Guns is the most human of comic-book adaptations to come around this summer. The screenplay is by Brotherhood creator Blake Masters. The repartee between Bobby and Stig is swift and clever, and the plot convolutions are twisty enough to keep us engaged without becoming unnecessarily complicated. It only lapses in the story thread involving Deb (Patton), Bobby's DEA girlfriend, who makes no secret of her other boyfriend. Icelandic filmmaker Baltasar Kormákur (following last year's Contraband, which also starred Wahlberg) is turning into a reliably adept director of Hollywood action movies. Although nothing has yet reached the level of mordant humor displayed in his nonaction Icelandic debut, 101 Reykjavík, 2 Guns comes closest. Maybe it's just an expression of relief after a summer of superheroes and fantasy scenarios, but 2 Guns is a refreshing blast.

The Conjuring uses every parlor trick imaginable to scare up a scream. The seen-it-all-before elements of this supernatural thriller, however, are more hoary than horrific. Purportedly based on a true story aren't they all? - the film largely takes place in the haunted Rhode Island farmhouse recently inhabited by the Perron family - Roger (Livingston), Carolyn (Taylor), and their five daughters. Soon, things don't merely go bump in the night; they crash, boom, and clatter. Enter husband-and-wife paranormal investigators Ed and Lorraine Warren (Wilson and Farmiga), who, before you know it, are engaged in a holy battle with straight-out-of-hell evil. (The power of Christ is needed to compel a straight face during this earsplitting nonsense.) The Conjuring wants it both ways, alleging veracity to legitimize its premise and then using familiar (read: overused) tactics to scare the bejesus out of you. 

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

More often than not The Heat is just stupid-funny, which circles us back to McCarthy, motor-mouthing four-letter fury like an operatic aria. As in his last film, Drive director Nicolas Winding Refn casts Gosling as the story's protagonist - Julian - but even more than before, he uses the actor as he might a model. Julian operates a Muay Thai boxing gym in Bangkok (where the film is set), which is really a front for a drug-smuggling ring run by his queen-bitch mother Crystal (Scott Thomas). When Julian's brother Billy (Burke) rapes and kills a 16-yearold girl, and is in turn executed by the girl's father, Crystal comes to exact the revenge that Julian seems reluctant to dole out. In the near future, the world community bands together in its ongoing war with the giant beasts called Kaiju, constructing massive robots, dubbed Jaegers (hunters), to fight them. The program has since been abandoned, but when pilots are needed for an early-model mecha, Jaeger meister Raleigh Becket (Hunnam) is pressed back into service. All the film's technical contributions are top-notch, and director Guillermo del Toro captures some of the most vivid battle scenes ever recorded in megamonster movies. Cumberbatch, playing a Starfleet officer gone rogue, is especially good as the morally complicated villain, and screenwriters Roberto Orci, Alex Kurtzman, and fanboys' favorite whipping boy, Damon Lindelof, keep the film moving at a quippy clip. There's really no fat here until the film feints a climax only to lurch the coaster-car back up the hill again. In fact, there's something rather retro-sweet about The To Do List, with its pre-Internet confusion (see Brandy searching an Encyclopedia Britannica fruitlessly for "rim job") and the wide berth it gives actual issues of sexual politics. Rob Zombie doesn't do covers, but when he does, they're a harpy-winged juggernaut flaming down Route 66.

"When I think I'm being subtle, it's really like a sledgehammer," he chuckles.

That's why the demonoid phenomenon has revved up Grand Funk Railroad's rocktastic anthem "We're an American Band" and sent it steaming through his new disc, Venomous Rat Regeneration Vendor.

"I wanted to pick a song that was bigger than the band. There's something so ridiculous about them singing, 'We're coming to your town/we'll help you party it down' that we just couldn't resist," he adds.

New album? Didn't he say 2010's Hellbilly Deluxe 2 might be his last physical release?

"I thought that by the time I made the next record, they physically wouldn't be making CDs."

Now Zombie leads the legions at the Austin stop for the Mayhem Festival, summoning Swedish berserkers Amon Amarth, eye burners Machine Head, and cosmic metalers Mastodon.



Expect the king of psychosleaze to deliver nothing less than a fire-and-brimstone extravaganza, even when mauling an American classic.

"We don't do it in a subtle way," he cracks. In the three years since last headlining the tour, Zombie directed his fifth film, supernatural shocker *The Lords of Salem*, and donned death mask face paint as the flick's filthy black metalers, Leviathan the Fleeing Serpent. The sometimes humorless, extreme-metal community turned a stern eye to his graveyard experiment.

"I didn't do it to make fun of it," says
Zombie. "When it's the lo-fi stuff, it's great."


### Killer Mike & El-P

Collaboration between El-P and Killer Mike was many years in the making, but *Run the Jewels*, the blindingly excellent LP the two veteran rappers released as a free download in late June, came together one afternoon in December.

"We were on that Coachella Cruise," remembers Mike, an Atlanta native who's released six solo albums and aided the production of more Dungeon Family discs than you could count on four hands. "We had three goddamn piña coladas in that bungalow where they had grass at. El [the NYC rapper who cofounded the influential but now defunct Definitive Jux label] was like, 'Fuck, let's do it together.'

"We got back, went up to the woods in upstate New York, and started laying down tracks."

The project was born out of the sessions for Mike's *R.A.P. Music*, a critically successful 2012 LP produced entirely by El-P. The two had toured constantly since the release of that album and, when they returned, wanted nothing more than to kick back.



"It's always more fun with a partner," says Mike. "Then you have somebody to laugh at immediately. A lot of the shit that me and El said, the other would just step off the microphone and look at the person, like – when he talks about 'Riverdance cleats on your face for the finisher.' That was fucking hysterical."

"That's just some laugh shit," EI-P adds. "If you're a rapper, that's where you start. No rapper starts out any other way than coming up with fun ways to explain that everybody else is trash and you're the shit."

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








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The Godfather!"

#### **UNCERTAIN LEASE AGREEMENTS** - THINGS TO CONSIDER

Summer is the busiest time of year in Central Texas for tenants moving into and out of leased property. All that moving often means that issues arise regarding entering into a new lease Here are a few common questions (and answers) related to entering a new lease.

I'm thinking about signing a lease that requires monthly payments but does not say how long the lease is going to last. Is that a bad idea?

It depends. The arrangement you described would create what is known as a "month-to-month periodic tenancy." This is a legal term that means the lease will continue for one-month periods as long as neither you nor your landlord decides to terminate the agreement. Either you or your landlord can terminate the lease as long as proper notice is given. The proper notice nec essary to terminate your potential lease would be one month, because you are creating a monthto-month arrangement. This might be good if you want the flexibility to end the lease after only renting the property for a short period Alternatively, this could be a bad arrangement if you hope to rent the property for a long period of time, because your landlord could terminate the lease with only one month's notice.

My potential landlord says she has never used a lease in the past and doesn't want to use one with me. Is that OK?

Your landlord wants to create an oral lease. Oral leases are enforceable as long as they are for 12 months or less; however, the problem with oral leases is proving the terms of the lease agreement if a dispute arises between the landlord and tenant. Many contested situations come down to one person's word against the other. Generally, if a landlord is making legitimate promises, then they should not have any reservations about putting these assurances in writing. Remember that a good written lease can protect your rights as well as the landlord's.
