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

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

Here are the Chronicle editorial board's endorsements for the May 27 party primary run-offs. There are only two races on the Democratic side, and we're between a rock and a hard place on one of those. We make no recommendations on the GOP side; when David Dewhurst starts looking good by comparison, it's time to punt. See much more election info at austinchronicle.com/election.

U.S. SENATE: DAVID ALAMEEL

Taking out incumbent Republican John Cornyn will be a tough challenge. While in the first round we felt that El Paso-based civil rights attorney Maxey Scherr had the better political skills, on the differing battleground of the primary we endorse Dallas-based dental tycoon and philanthropist David Alameel. While relatively politically inexperienced, he has the deep pockets to take on Cornyn. And he's far better than opponent Kesha Rogers, a Houston-based DINO (Democrat in Name Only), Lyndon LaRouche supporter whose constant comparisons of President Obama to Hitler are tasteless, demeaning to the electoral process, and just plain nuts.



AGRICULTURE COMMISSIONER: NO ENDORSEMENT

Sad times for Democrats. Finally, they have two solid candidates - Sens. Wendy Davis and Leticia Van de Putte – at the top of the ticket. but that's counterbalanced by raw incompetence in this race. 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
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
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WHAT ABOUT WIND POWERED SPORTS?

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

Fixing What Ain't Broke

DOES CITY WANT FAIR HIRING, OR TO BREAK THE UNION?

In an extraordinary display of public solidarity last Thursday, several hundred Austin firefighters and their supporters showed up at the City Council meeting to view the deliberations over the proposed U.S. Department of Justice consent decree, which would govern the hiring of new cadets. There were enough people

on hand and registered for a potential five hours of witness testimony, although a sidebar agreement whittled that down to about an hour. An overwhelming majority of the witnesses, led by Bob Nicks, president of the Firefighters Austin Association, testified against accepting the decree, which nevertheless was eventually approved by Council, 5-2. If the decree is indeed imposed by a federal court, the DOJ will assume overall responsibility for

AFD hiring for the next four to eight years. As we've reported over the years ("The Color of Fire," May 13, 2011), like far too many U.S. fire departments, the AFD has had problems creating and maintaining a diverse and just work force. Indeed, it was only a previous DOJ consent decree, lasting from 1977 to 1982, that successfully integrated the department for a previous generation. But that generation has retired or is entering retirement, and the current hiring process has been stalled by a collec-

bargaining between city management and the AFA.

Enter the DOJ, which began a review a year ago. It included an unsuccessful mediation between the city and the union, during which the two sides couldn't even meet in the same room - the mediator moved from room to room, trying and failing to find

common ground. The nominal issue pits hiring "standards" against cadet "diversity" - but in fact, the union charges, the city has essentially used the excuse of the hiring disagreement to look for ways to cut the union out of collective bargaining altogether.

The Sky Might Fall

Indeed, that's where we are now, with no contract in place and the department proceeding under civil service rules. The union has fought to get back to the table; city management has waited for the DOJ response to determine its next move.

The consent decree found the 2012 hiring process - which employed a poorly designed and badly administered test - seriously flawed, and all parties agreed that a consent decree covering the 2012 test would be acceptable. But the union balked at the same solution covering the 2013 process which had received considerable AFA input, showed no "adverse impact" on minorities in the hiring range, and would have resulted in a cadet class with substantial improvement in minority hiring.

Without getting too far into the weeds, the Council debate last week eventually turned on a motion by CM Chris Riley, initially seconded by CM Bill Spelman, to delay the vote one week while asking the DOJ to consider splitting the decree and allowing hiring to proceed under the 2013 standards - which produced minority numbers that would in fact match what the DOJ would require. Riley noted that such tacking-and-trimming is commonplace in legal negotiations; city attorneys (ever cautious or ever misleading) said they couldn't predict the DOJ response, but suspected that, absent Austin's consent, the DOJ would simply take its next option - suing the city in federal court. That would not just leave already muchdelayed AFD hiring indefinitely in limbo, but potentially expose the city to much greater costs and back-pay liabilities.

Even motion-seconder Spelman was persuaded by what Nicks would later call, in a note to AFA members, "the city attorney's 'chicken little the sky is falling speech," and Council voted to accept the decree - via a substitute motion by Mayor Pro Tem Sheryl Cole, which would only request that the DOJ "mitigate" the decree after the fact.

See You in Court

That's hardly the end of the matter, and what all parties most feared - continuing delay in hiring new firefighters - remains as likely as it was before Council voted. CM (and former AFA president) Mike Martinez, who was left to join Riley in a 5-2 dissent, was stunned by Council's circular dance with legal counsel, and by his colleagues' refusal to consider even a oneweek delay for negotiation. "We will not be moving forward by approving this consent decree," Martinez warned. "We will be moving very far backwards, I promise you."

Nicks has vowed to seek intervenor status at federal court, with the intention of fighting the decree for what may be several years. City management may be counting on the AFA failing to achieve intervenor status - and could buckle back into negotiations if the union succeeds. But considering the city's intransigence on contract negotiations, it's a betterthan-even bet that the entire process will now be litigated for several more years.

Indeed, it's difficult to tell if city management's higher priority is not really to establish greater equity at AFD - but rather to wrest all hiring input from the union's hands. Promoting the consent decree before the Council vote, the hardcore company men on the Statesman's editorial board stated their position clearly: "As the employer, the fire chief should be responsible for hiring procedures." Since it was management's bungling that scuppered the 2012 process, and largely the union's influence that made the 2013 process successful - the city's priority also seems painfully obvious.

Highway 45 Revisited

COUNCIL REAFFIRMS OPPOSITION TO 'AQUIFER TOLL ROAD'

The more one considers the plan for **State Highway 45** – its patchwork of moving parts, the clever side-stepping of federal environmental requirements, and the overall potential backwash - the more nightmarish things look.

As last week's resolution passed by City Council makes clear in so many "whereases," there has been no comprehensive, fully inclusive study of how all the puzzle pieces will fit together should the toll road actually materialize. Nor has there been a thorough vetting of the traffic, environmental, and financial impacts of the road, which would travel across the recharge zone of the Edwards Aquifer to link the southern tip of MoPac to FM 1626 in Hays County.


The resolution passed on a vote of 6-1, with Mayor Lee Leffingwell voting no, stating his belief that the road project is already a done deal based on agreements already reached between Travis and Hays counties, the

Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization. and the Texas Department of Transporta-

tion. "If it is not built, it won't be because of this resolution," he said, casting doubt on the optimism expressed by resolution sponsor Kathie Tovo before the vote reaffirming the city's opposition. "I think that's an important message to send to our partners," she said.

On that score, the resolution directed the city manager to reach out to those partners as well as the Regional Mobility Authority (or the toll road authority) to better establish Austin's place at the table, done deal or no.

Given that SH 45 has been on and off the transportation planning maps since the late Eighties, it's understandable that the big-picture scope of the project is rather hazy. But the Council resolution breaks down the road plan's shortcomings point by point, beginning with the statement that SH 45 would effectively turn MoPac into a "western Interstate Highway 35 alternative [that] has not been studied or carefully considered" by the participating agencies.



GIVE 'EM AN INCH ...

In its infancy, SH 45 Southwest was envisioned as a major piece of a circular loop around Austin that would extend from South MoPac to SH 130. In its current incarnation. proponents are pitching SH 45 as just a little innocent country road stretching just under four miles - though no one really believes it'll stay that size if this part gets built.

> Meanwhile, regional planners are weighing improvements to the southern end of MoPac from the point where the bridge crosses Lady Bird Lake, but TxDOT and CAMPO are viewing them as entirely separate projects apart from SH 45, which road boosters want to build first. The resolution advises that it would be prudent to first complete studies for South MoPac and

the Lady Bird Lake bridge before

In addition, the resolution cites traffic studies by CAMPO and UT's Network Modeling Center that reveal "only a limited transportation benefit" to Shady Hollow residents who are pinning their hopes on SH 45 alleviating congestion on Brodie Lane, the roadway that Havs County residents and other commuters use to cut through their neighborhood to get to MoPac and beyond

starting work on the toll road.

Remember - SH 45 was sold to voters as a "safety issue" in the county bond election of 1997, and voters overwhelmingly approved bond dollars to pay for right-of-way purchases along the route. "Safety" is no longer used to market the project that is primarily driven

by real estate and political interests (aided by vocal Shady Hollow neighbors), just as it's been throughout its cyclical lifespan. To illustrate the point about the road being development-driven, at taxpayer expense, consider this Feb. 15, 2002, dispatch from former Chronicle scribe Mike Clark-Madison: "In a victory

for Southwest suburbanites and, in particular, developer Gary Bradley, the CAMPO board voted Monday not to delete [SH 45] - the erstwhile Outer Loop - from the region's longrange transportation plan." Come to think of it, our archives provide an apt summary of the project's herky-jerky history: "TxDOT Scuttles SH 45 South - For Now," reads a headline from July 2002, just five months after Clark-Madison's report under the headline "CAMPO Keeps SH 45."

ENVIRONMENTAL OBLIGATIONS

One constant throughout the long-running road debate is the road's location in the Barton Springs segment of the aquifer. Pro-SH 45 folks insist that this will be the most environmentally sensitive road in Central Texas, and it probably will be, but there's a limit to how environmentally sensitive a major highway can be. Moreover, both the city and county jointly hold what's called a **Balcones Canyonlands Conservation**

Plan regional permit with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Under that permit, they're required, as the resolution notes, to "preserve the environmental integrity of Flint Ridge Cave," a recharge feature for the aquifer, located on city land. Federal laws also require protection of the Barton Springs salamander, and recent environmental studies by city staff have shown that recharge from the proposed route could reach Barton Springs in three to four days.

Then, too, the city has important real estate interests of its own - our own - to consider, and that's the \$40 million we've plunked into preserve lands under the BCCP permit, specifically to guard against unwanted and potentially harmful development like SH 45.

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Climate Change: City Targets Zero Emissions

As the city of Austin grows closer to completing the goals set by its 2007 Climate Protection Plan, last month City Council members decided to strengthen Austin's climate change efforts. Responding to environmental advocacy for something bigger, broader, and bolder, they've set a new goal: By 2050, Austin plans to implement, citywide, net-zero greenhouse gas emissions i.e., "carbon neutrality." Citing increasing evidence of worldwide climate change and the necessity to act, the policy would move city departments steadily forward to netzero emissions, and "develop and implement a program to assist all citizens, businesses, organizations, and visitors in achieving carbon neutrality."

The resolution, sponsored by Council members Chris Riley, Sheryl Cole, and Bill Spelman, passed April 10 with Mayor Lee **Leffingwell** casting the only opposing vote. It's said to be the most aggressive locally adopted climate change plan to date, and expands on past resolutions to include more city sectors, more benchmarking measures, and more community-held responsibility.

In addition, the resolution emphasizes the City Council's preference to "achieve this goal as soon as it is feasible."

Joep Meijer, owner of sustainability consulting firm the Right Environment, and a founder of nonprofit Climate Buddies, helped draft the resolution. He said it is too early in the process to detail how each specific sector - mainly targeting energy, transportation, and waste/industrial – will be involved. The drafters decided to "set the goal, make it as ambitious as possible, and then do the planning and implementation process afterward."

Sector-specific plans are currently in their development stages, and will be presented by City Manager Marc Ott to Council by Sept. 1, "including a framework for meeting short- and long-term communitywide greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals." The final, comprehensive Climate

rates, and more." The plan will detail what steps toward zero-emission are achievable for each sector, and how other sectors can pick up the slack, should one sector fall short in reaching its goals.

Austin's 2007 Climate Protection Plan was intended to make Austin "the leading city in the nation in the effort to reduce the negative impacts of global warming," according to the program's website, and was indeed one of the most progressive plans of its time. According to Meijer, that project is now near completion - and its lack of a goal beyond 2020 is why having a new plan is so important.

"The current Climate Protection Plan [from 2007] was very outdated," said Meijer. "It only focuses on city operations, but city operations compared to a [whole] city is only a small drop in the bucket." Meijer also said the old plan lacked updating mechanisms, planning processes, and review periods to keep it up-to-date. All of these things will be addressed by the new plan.

Riley's chief of staff, Lewis Leff, a primary drafter of the resolution, said the original plan also failed to address climate resiliency, which is a climate's ability to absorb the impacts of climate change without significant negative effects. "We real-

Council: Vested Interests

After last Thursday's marathon, today's City Council session (May 22) may seem like a mini-vacation. Last week, Council took on ridesharing (still trying to figure out how best to enable and regulate it), did what they could about SH 45 (in the wee hours, looking for last-ditch ways either to block it or make it environmentally safer - see "Then There's This," p.14), and in the headline donnybrook, returned to the long-troubled question of hiring at the Austin Fire Department (see Point Austin: "Fixing What Ain't Broke," p.13). None of those issues will be resolved anytime soon, but this week's agenda looks a little less onerous.

Maybe.

There will be at least a few hot-button items, notably the return of vested ("grandfathered") development rights for (in theory) second and third readings (Item 59). The public hearing is closed, but at Tuesday's work session Council Member Laura Morrison proposed several amendments that would serve to tighten the regulations governing Managed Growth **Agreements**, especially those which arrive at Council without staff or Planning Commission recommendations. It's not clear that Morrison has the votes, but the dais-only discussion should be interesting.

Also arriving are a couple of **economic incentive** packages, these for tech firms Spansion and Flextronics. The funding involved is state forgiveness on sales taxes, via the Texas Enterprise Fund, and Austin's role is to designate the firms as "Texas Enterprise Zone" projects, the local imprimatur for the state program. Although no city money would be garnished and the Items (5 & 6) are nominally on the consent agenda, they're unlikely to proceed without at least some Sturm und Drang about the state's (i.e., Gov. Rick Perry's) economic priorities.

The morning briefings - normally updates of workin-progress - generally raise few eyebrows, but today's might be an exception, as the **Project Connect** Team will report on the status of its urban rail proposal, rapidly nearing the end lines of Capital Metro and City Council approval and presumably a bond-ballot design for November. They've gotten to the proposed corridor draft (see "Three Routes Mulled for CCAG," p.18), and are addressing financing and governance, but there's still much debate over the details. and expect at least some of that debate to air during the meeting.

If all that proceeds as planned, a brace of resolutions offered by Council Member Chris Riley might seem unobjectionable, at least at the resolution stage. He's got a couple of things working on parking programs (Item 42 on a Mueller neighborhood parking management district; Item 43 on a residential parking permit program during "high-impact events" like festivals and construction), and a "climate resiliency" proposal (Item 48) that would work climate response strategies into this year's budget planning.

The listed public hearings are on the much-delayed and recently controversial Festival Beach/Fiesta Gardens Park Master Plan and on a proposal to permit and regulate "mobile retail sales" - a trailer for every wide spot in the road! Early word was that the Festival Beach plan is still not quite soup, and at staff request will likely be postponed once again.

There will be plenty of other dishes on the menu, not to mention that it's Take Heart Day, National Safety Month, and Stroke Awareness Month - so no matter what happens, we're covered. The musical honoree is the Brown Recluse himself, legendary Tejano King Manuel "Cowboy" Donley. Long may he reign.

ized that was the missing piece to our Climate Protection Plan," Leff said. "We thought it was important as the environmental leaders to set a new target, and that it would be long term."

Meijer said he believes the resolution's bold goal is not only an achievable reality for Austin, but that it will be completed before the 2050 target date. The resolution acknowledges that for this to happen, however, the plan must take into account the considerable challenges that may be presented by variables such as population and business growth. In a city that becomes home to approximately 110 new residents each day, the community's impact on greenhouse gas emissions is significant.

Jay Banner, climate change expert and director of UT-Austin's Environmental Science Institute, said population growth would be a huge challenge in reaching netzero emissions. "An increased population will need more resources, more water, more transportation," said Banner, "all of which will require more energy, which in turn will require a bigger effort to achieve net-zero emissions."

Banner also said that while it is possible that enough Austin residents will take personal responsibility over their emissions to reach the resolution's goal, it would require a cultural shift in attitudes. "City leadership can only go so far in this regard," he said. "In my opinion, ATX residents have the potential to go the distance in making this shift, but an external driver will likely be essential."

Meijer said he considers Austin's population growth not a challenge, but an opportunity. "Adding more people, increasing density, is a really good mechanism for lowering environmental impact," Meijer said. "Change means we can make decisions. If this city was stagnant, it would be much more difficult."

Banner said despite potential challenges like population growth and community ownership, the resolution presents an excellent goal. "Austin could be a leader in this regard and catalyze change elsewhere," Banner said. - Lizzie Jespersen

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Project Connect: Three Rail Plans Mulled for CCAG

At the May 16 meeting of the **Central Corridor Advisory Group.** the **Project Connect** team was expected to offer its recommendation for phasing options for the initial route it had proposed on May 2 (from Highland Mall south to East Riverside). That didn't happen, but instead, the team presented three different options for the core plan, all starting at Grove & Riverside on the south end, and including a new bridge over Lady Bird Lake.

- 1) At an estimated \$1.38 billion, with an estimated daily ridership of 16,000-20,000, the complete urban rail plan would run about 9.5 miles, from Riverside/Grove to Highland, including possibly a tunnel at Hancock Center. The annual operating costs would be around \$22 million.
- 2) For an estimated \$990 million, this alternative would run for about 7.3 miles, from Riverside/Grove to Hancock Center. It would serve about 13,000-17,000 riders daily, with annual operating costs of about \$17.3 million.
- **3)** The third option would run about 5.7 miles, from Riverside/Grove to the north edge of the UT campus, at Dean Keeton and San Jacinto, serving somewhere between 10.000 and 14,000 riders each day. The least

expensive of the options, it would cost about \$820 million to build, with annual operating costs of just \$13.5 million. Some opponents of the Highland corridor plan prefer this option, because it would presumably leave open the possibility of a subsequent western route along Guadalupe/Lamar.

Officials declined to make an official recommendation at the meeting, instead planning to spend the next few weeks finding which plan would garner the most support from voters. Ideally, under any plan chosen, the

Federal Transit Administration would cover about half of the total cost, with bonds covering the rest which is why officials hope to gauge public support before putting it to voters in a November bond election.

Going forward, CCAG is expected to vote on a plan before making its recommendation to the Austin City Council, the Capital Metro board, and the Lone Star Rail board of directors on June 13. On June 23, the CapMetro board is expected to vote on a plan, and the City Council will be asked to approve a plan on June 26. In order for a proposal to be on the November bond election, the City Council would have to do so by mid-August. - Mac McCann

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ACC Adjunct Faculty Sees Progress

Austin Community College's

adjunct faculty is coming closer to a deal with the board and administration, in a key change to calculating how much work it really takes to run a class.

Current ACC policy says that, includ-

ing preparation and grading, it takes an adjunct five hours a week to teach a three-and-a-half-hour class. By contrast, a full-time lecturer is paid for eight hours for that same course. Moreover, while an adjunct teaching three courses is not classified as half time, a lecturer is full time with only five. **David Albert**, government professor and vice president of adjunct faculty for the ACC chapter of the American Federation of Teachers, said, "It doesn't really pass the smell test ... They use that same ratio to underpay us."

The student pays the same tuition for a credit hour, whether provided by an adjunct or a full-

ter of the American Federation of Teachers, said, "It doesn't really pass the smell test ... They use that same ratio to underpay us." The student pays the same tuition for a credit hour, whether provided by an adjunct or a full-time lecturer, but the adjunct only gets about 70% of the salaried staffers' pay for it. While their hourly rates are the same, the adjunct is calculated to have spent less time teaching. Albert said, "If they use the ratio they're using, you can be teaching three classes and still be under 20 hours. That's absurd."

that's the point at which adjuncts become eligible for enrollment in the **Texas Retirement System**, and for ACC's health care coverage. That means many current employees depend on their insured spouse, or just go without insurance.

ACC-AFT's proposal is simple: ACC has to admit how much work adjuncts do. They want ACC to follow federal guidelines that suggest a new ratio for classroom time to total workload, so that three-and-a-half hours of course credit would count as over seven hours of



work. That means adjuncts would receive around 90% as much per credit hour as the permanent staff: That differential, Albert explained, reflects the extra administrative duties of full-timers.

There's still a long way to go on the proposal, but Albert expects further discussion during the board's budget meeting on June 2. At the same time, he and his colleagues see positive movement on the plan to create additional hybrid lecturer/support staff posts. known as instructional associates (see "ACC Faculty Pitches Staff Stability Plan," April 25). Outgoing Adjunct Faculty Association secretary Becky Villarreal and representatives of the ACC-AFT recently met with ACC Vice President of Finance and Budget Neil Vickers. Villarreal said he told her "the college was very much interested in establishing those positions, as well as lectureship positions." There will still be some negotiation with department heads over exact positions, and the union and administration differ on the hiring process. Villarreal said the college wants to make internal appointments, while "we want the adjuncts who work for the college right now to be interviewed and have some competition with each other."

Judge Yeakel: Hyatt Lawsuit Can Proceed

On May 13, in a tentative victory for free speech rights, U.S. District Judge Lee Yeakel rejected a Texas Water Development Board effort to quash a wrongful termination lawsuit. Yeakel ruled that former agency coordinator Diane Hyatt can pursue her suit against the administrators who fired her – allegedly for Working While Democrat.

Hyatt was fired two years ago (May 11, 2012), after six years with strong performance evaluations at the TWDB for her work as coordinator of the state's revolving fund that provides financing for water projects. She was dismissed a day after her name appeared in an Austin American-Statesman story about campaign finance "bundling" in the 2012 Austin mayor's race. Hyatt had bundled contributions for candidate Brigid Shea; the story quoted her in support of Shea, and noted in passing her position at the TWDB. Although a supervisor had not objected to Hyatt talking to a reporter about the campaign, the next day she was called in and informed that she had violated the agency's ethics policy by "engaging in political activity on state time or utilizing state resources," and would be terminated (without the option of resigning).

Hyatt's bosses had searched her computer and found a few incidental emails con-



cerning her fundraising efforts, and used those to justify her dismissal. However, a subsequent open-records search, reports her attorney **Derek Howard**, turned up many emails with political content circulated by "approximately 20" TWDB employees, all of them either promoting Republican causes or disparaging Democrats – including joking about **assassinating President Barack Obama** or disseminating racist jokes. One such email between employees reads: "Give a man a fish and he eats for a day. Give the man a welfare check, a forty ounce malt liquor, a crack

pipe and some Air Jordans and he votes Democrat for a lifetime." (See "GOP Politics Only at the State Water Board," Newsdesk, Dec. 18, 2012.)

Following her dismissal, Hyatt told the *Chronicle*, "This violation of my civil rights shows that no matter how diligent one is at their job, the agency can arbitrarily remove us on a pretext. Hundreds of other employee emails were political, many of them [sent by] managers. I was singled out for being in the newspaper."

Howard says there has been no action taken against any of the other employees





"who had engaged in types of political speech, all of whom were on the Republican/ Tea Party side of the fence," even after open-records searches revealed their emails: "The person who joked about advocating the assassination of Obama," Howard said, "is still working there."

Hyatt's lawsuit, filed against TWDB Executive Administrator Melanie Callahan and Deputy Executive Administrator Lisa Glenn (who wrote the dismissal memo), charges that the emails were used simply as a pretext to dismiss an employee whose political affiliations supervisors found objectionable. The defendants had asked for a summary dismissal of Hyatt's claims, and Yeakel rejected their motion. "It's a big deal," said Howard, "because the state was trying to throw the case out and the judge said, 'No, it's going forward.""

Yeakel's ruling, while rejecting some of Hyatt's claims, noted that the agency had clearly failed to enforce its ethics policy against other employees, and that the newspaper story was the "triggering event" for Hyatt's firing. He ruled that "a reasonable jury could consider the evidence and find that Glenn and Callahan failed to show that they would have terminated Hyatt's employment in the absence of Hyatt's [constitutionally] protected speech."

The judge directed the parties to propose a schedule for trial by the end of the month. - Michael King



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Brewskee! Tears, Cheers, and Beers

League founder **Eric Pavony** at last vear's competitition

The eyes of the rapidly growing sporting subculture centered on Skee-Ball will fix upon Austin this week, as the boardwalk arcade game's most esteemed American league settles into the Scoot Inn on East Fourth Street to crown a national champion - and try to save their sport.

Brooklyn-based Brewskee-Ball has witnessed a wealth of success during its eight years in existence, turning a somewhat dinky idea - what if we took a silly game seriously? - into a league inhabiting four cities (New York, Austin, Wilmington, and San Francisco) on the strength of nearly 1,600 rollers. It's been covered by everybody: NPR, ESPN, the Chronicle, The New York Times. Sunday evening at the BEEB, Brewskee-Ball's annual, nationally attended roller's tournament, it crowns its fifth champion. Expect tears, cheers, and a whole lot of beers.

Sentiment surrounding this year's championship – held in Austin for a second time after a three-year run in Brooklyn - is expected to take new shape, however. It's the first BEEB to take place with the rollers' general knowledge that their league, the largest and longest continuously running Skee-Ball league in the world, is facing imminent danger - perhaps even extinction.

Since April 2010, league founder and Skee-E-O Eric Pavony has been trying to quietly settle a cease-and-desist order from Skee-Ball Inc., the Pennsylvania manufacturer that makes the lanes on which Brewskee-Ball rolls. The company's mandate is that Brewskee-Ball remove the word "Skee-Ball" from its name. Pavony - who successfully filed a trademark with the U.S.

Patent and Trademark Office in 2008, three years after a handshake agreement with Skee-Ball Inc. CEO Joe Sladek supposedly allowed him to create the league (a conversation Sladek acknowledged under oath) - says there's no other way to make reference to the sport.

"They're trying to restrict us from saying 'Skee-Ball,' but we can't figure out a way to talk about it without using that exact word," says Pavony, who flew into Austin last Thursday in order to start prepping for this weekend's festivities. "It just so happens to

Indeed, imagine, for a moment, how difficult would have been for Major League Baseball to grow its audience in its early years if the Abner Doubleday estate had demanded MLB's commissioner and players to refer to the game as "four-baggers."

Or if Dr. James Naismith had declared postmortem that "basketball" leagues restructure as "roundball."

The league has lived in a state of diminished growth throughout Pavony's four-year effort to settle out of court, with city Skee-E-Os barred from properly promoting their leagues and product. Here in Austin, local Skee-E-O Eric Cooper, who moved to town in 2008 after working as a manager at Ace Bar in Manhattan, where Brewskee-Ball filled its first frames, suggests his 200-roller franchise could be three times larger if it hadn't been hampered by the lawsuit.

"It's an institution now," he says, referring to the three eight-week "skeesons" that take place at the Scoot Inn three nights a week for 24 weeks each year. "People know



about it. They think of the Scoot as the Skee-Ball bar with bands, or the venue with Skee-Ball lanes. We've created something awesome and haven't been able to move it forward, because we don't know what this ruling is going to be."

He'll likely know soon. With conversations at a stalemate, Pavony has decided to take the case to trial, lawyering up with trademark specialists Fish & Richardson P.C. He's built a RocketHub fundraising campaign ("Skee the People") to raise the cash for F&R's representation, with the hopes of scoring \$100,000. He'd raised nearly \$24,000 when the *Chronicle* went to press on Wednesday, with another large sum expected from the BEEB this weekend.

"The only reason I do what I do is because I love this game," says Pavony, who calls his league "the most positive thing in the world."

"You think when I started this league that my end goal was to kill the Skee-Ball trademark? Absolutely not. It was the complete opposite. It was to promote the game in new markets with new demographics and come up with new ways to play the game socially. We thought Skee-Ball Inc. and our company were mutually benefitting from this and could coexist for many years. Then they had to go and do this.

"We've decided that now's the time to go public and turn what's been a really dark cloud in my life into a positive, uplifting - Chase Hoffberger thing."

More Poor Planning

Construction was still halted this week on the Waller Creek Tunnel intake facility in Waterloo Park, after the city admitted last week that the building design is too tall for the Capitol view corridor it sits in. Council voted Thursday to approve up to \$1.8 million for outside legal counsel to work on the problem. KXAN quoted Mayor Lee Leffingwell as saying, "The engineers and designers are responsible for the error, in my opinion," but it's hard to imagine that things could have gotten this far along without anyone in the city's Public Works or **Planning and Development Review** departments catching this fairly basic error.

Embarrassingly, the revelation

came to light the day after a Planning Commission meeting (see "Poor Planning," May 16) whose agenda was dominated by three different cases where Development Review had permitted illegal construction, and zoning change recommendations to retroactively fit the construction - Nick Barbaro on the ground.



Owens Faces More Charges A Travis County grand jury this week indict-

ed Rashad Charjuan Owens, charging the accused in the SXSW Red River hit-and-run

with one count of capital murder, four counts of felony murder, and 24 counts of aggravated assault.

The charges, handed down Monday evening, May 19, are more severe than the initial set, which charged Owens with capital murder and the 24 counts of aggravated assault, but didn't include the charges of felony murder. The 21-year-old Killeen resident has spent the past 68 days in Travis County Jail, where he's being held on \$5.5 million bail. Owens crashed

into a crowd of festivalgoers while fleeing police, prosecutors charge.

Tuesday's Austin American-Statesman

reported that officials "had not said" whether or not they would pursue additional murder charges in the wake of two additional deaths

> - those of **DeAndre Tatum**, 18, and **Sandy Le**, 26 – that occurred after initial charges were filed in connection with the deaths of Jamie West. 27, and Steven Craenmehr, 35. We were unable to confirm at press time that these new charges do indeed correspond to the four deaths; though that seems likely, the D.A.'s office is not releasing comments on the grand jury action at this time.

> Owens, who has not been seen in public since his arrest on the morning of March 13, is scheduled to

make his first appearance in court on June 3, after two previous postponements.

The Right Hails Hall

Lawmakers want to impeach him. His fellow **UT System Regents** want him to quit. But **Wallace Hall** has decided he's going to stay on the system board until they lever him out. Surprisingly, the **Koch** brothers-funded right has fallen in behind him, in an increasingly ugly and tense fight over the governance of the state's top university.

Hall has become a burr under UT's saddle, accused of running a politically motivated witch hunt to force out UT President Bill

Powers. He failed, but on May 12 the House Select

Committee on **Transparency** in **State Agency Operations** voted 7-1 to move forward with impeachment proceedings over how Hall abused his office (see "Committee Finds Grounds for Hall Impeachment," May 16). Three days later, at a regularly scheduled meeting of the system board, Chairman **Paul Foster** attempted to bring the highly embarrassing and damaging

situation to a close by requesting that Hall step down. While he was not prepared to force a no-confidence vote – nor was he prepared to say that Hall had done anything wrong – Foster said Hall should resign, for the good of the institution.

Foster joins a chorus of voices demanding that Hall quit. Transparency Select Committee Co-Chair **Carol Alvarado**, D-Houston, commended Foster and said, "I encourage Regent Hall to do what is in the best interest of UT System students and institutions." The **Texas Coalition for Excellence in Higher**

Education echoed her stance, noting that "it is clear from these Regents' statements that Regent Hall's actions have become a significant distraction and detriment to effective governance by the Board, and by extension, the entire UT System."

But Hall wasn't looking to accept any good wishes in his future endeavors. He quickly responded by letter to Foster, saying he would not resign. And he seems to have attracted some well-funded allies on the

fringe right, not least the
Texas chapter of **Americans for Prosperity**, which savaged Alvarado's committee
and tried to paint Hall as the
hero of the tale. In a joint
statement, State Director **Mike Hasson** and Policy
Director **Peggy Venable** wrote
that he had "revealed some
activities, which, at minimum,
deserve public scrutiny and
may well reveal evidence of
wrongdoing."

Follow the money time: AFP was founded and is funded by American oligarchs the Koch Bros. In an odd coincidence, so is the Franklin Center, which runs the research/attack group **Watchdog.org**. The day after the Transparency Committee meeting, it published a dossier that it claims backs Hall's allegation that lawmakers used their influence with Powers to get relatives into UT Law School. With the committee scheduled to draft impeachment articles today, May 22, the question is, which limb of the Koch hydra will strike next?

them to the cold, uncaring hand of government. The message is: We're doing this for the poor people's own good. Their chief budgeteer, Rep. **Paul Ryan**, trotted this theme out at a recent right-wing rally, condemning school lunches as unloving "Obamafare"

plopped on plates by unsmilling cafeteria personnel: "What they're offering people is a full stomach and an empty soul," he oozed.

If that doesn't make you gag, try another **subsidized lunch program** that tender-hearted GOP budget whackers never mention, much less demand that it be eliminated. It's the tax subsidy for corporate meals, drinks, and entertainment. Multimillionaire CEOs can go wining and dining on your and

my dime, writing off their high-dollar lunches, cocktails, dinners, and club hopping as a business expense. And expensive it is for us taxpayers – this subsidy adds up to more than \$12 billion a year. And that doesn't count the human cost of

executive initiative that is sapped by this giveaway and the lack of love a CEO feels from being dependent on unsmiling taxpayers.

We ought to be subsidizing healthy meals for poor people, but not a dime for fat cat CEOs dining out at Chez Gourmand.





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Sneed House ruins tell a story beneath and behind modern Austin

Over its long history, a number of stories have been written about what has come to be known as the "Sneed House." Like teasers in a TV news report, they typically begin with titillating commentary on its origins, meant to catch the reader's interest. This story, I hope, will be different; but like any writer, I want you to keep reading. To that end, let me briefly introduce the Sneed House, also called "Comal Bluff."

According to scans of faded documents generously provided by the Austin History Center, the house was commissioned by Sebron Graham Sneed in 1852, on a hill near what is now the corner of I-35 and William Cannon Drive, in what is now the Dove Springs neighborhood. Slavery was legal in Austin then, as it was in all of Texas, and Sneed was a slaveowner, which came in handy in procuring labor power for the house's construction. The house was ready to live in by 1857. What the slaves built for a Sneed and his family was a six-room limestone estate, a rather severe edifice designed (most likely) by Abner Cook, the same man who designed the Governor's Mansion.

A look into the timeline of the house suggests a long run of deteriorating luck that began almost as soon as construction was completed. The Sneeds were owners of 21 slaves as late as 1860, a year before the start of the Civil War. Sebron was a delegate to the Texas Secession Convention, which decided the state of Texas should secede from the Union and join the Confederacy. Sneed's sons fought for the Confederacy, and Comal Bluff was used as a Confederate recruiting station. (A 2013 Austin American-Statesman article says the house was a Confederate hospital. Either way, the political affiliation seems clear. Perhaps the house served as both.) In the end, things didn't turn out well for slavery, and by 1865 the laborers who'd built and maintained the house a few years earlier were no longer obliged to do so.

The Sneed family gained various positions of prestige around the Austin area both before and after the war. Sebron himself was a judge. His son, Thomas, was briefly mayor of Austin. The family lived in the house until 1921, when it was sold. According to the Statesman, a man named Calvin Hughs purchased the house from a Sneed descendant and lived there until his death, at which point his daughter stayed there until she died at an old age some time "in the 1960s."



This is when the story of the house starts to become a troubling puzzle of squabble and conflict between various corporate owners interested in making use of the land for profit and those, like the Texas Historical Commission, who wish to harness and commemorate the significance of the house as a relic of Texas' past. More recently a local resident, Bobby Cervantes, has made serious efforts to save the property. While he's had luck securing the nearby Sneed family burial plot, he has had much more difficulty keeping current owners Indo Pak Investments LLC from infringing on the ruins of the house itself. "At times," Cervantes says, "it seems as though no one cares. Calls, emails go unanswered, City Hall and our City Council couldn't care less."

It is not hard to sympathize with his frustration. Reading the reports of meetings and lawsuits and appeals is confusing and disheartening, as no clear plan ever seems to shake loose from the proceedings. There have been times when the house has come to public attention, only to disappear again until someone new (like myself) comes along and takes it up as though we were the first to hear of it.

All along, the house itself has remained in the same place, on an unnamed lot behind a shopping center, surrounded by

apartment complexes on Austin's mostly ignored southeast side. Since its last resident departed, "in the 1960s," it has gone through a persistent and seemingly irreversible process of decay, the windows boarded up and antique interior elements stolen by pillagers, until its original details have been utterly stripped away, its white walls marred with graffiti. In 1989, at the end of a series of meetings and threats between the city and then-owners Data Port Inc. (the city wanted the owners to secure and renovate the house: the owners said they couldn't afford it), most of the house was burned down - razed in a devastating and permanent way. All that remains is a stone, Gothic skeleton.



A Lost History

This was the state of Comal Bluff when I first came to learn of it, in the early Nineties. I grew up in Dove Springs, the low-income, mostly Latino neighborhood that currently circles the house. One day my mom stopped at the corner of Bluff Springs Road and Nelms Drive and pointed out the car window toward the trees on the other side of a chain-link fence. Near the top of the tree line was the unmistakable and thrilling sight of a ruin: the white stone walls of something ancient. She said it had been a plantation, and that it had burned down. My mind was blown, because this was not the kind of history that was supposed to exist only a few hundred yards from the Supercuts where I had my head buzzed, behind the Target where my mom bought my school clothes. I'd had some introduction to the Civil War and slavery, some understanding of what took place on a plantation - mostly based on my sister's VHS copy of Gone With the Wind. They were not stories I associated with Austin. How could they be, when despite my years of Texas history in Austin public schools, and even through my ensuing high school years, the state's intimate relationship with slavery and segregation was rarely, if ever, mentioned?

In the context of this astounding ignorance, the "plantation" my mom pointed out to me that day was an impossible insistence of history upon a city and a neighborhood that, from my perspective, didn't even have one. How could slavery and the Civil War possibly exist in a neighborhood that as far as my 8-year-old mind knew hadn't come into being until the early Eighties?

Imagine my surprise when my mom later pointed out the Williamson Creek Cemetery (distinct from the Sneed family plot), a small and overgrown graveyard near the intersection of I-35 and Stassney Lane, the highway separating the cemetery from Comal Bluff, like the modern ancestor of an early Texas river set into the hills of old Austin country. According to documents provided by the Texas Historical Commission, the cemetery is known to hold the graves of members of the Sneed family as well as some of former slaves, and has seen its own history of neglect and abuse, including the vandalization and theft of headstones. When my mom took me into the cemetery (nearly 20 years ago) it was little more than a patch of weeds and brush in an anonymous lot. Stones had been kicked

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over and names had been rubbed away. The cemetery is currently settled within short reach of the Metropolis movie theatre and a Krispy Kreme doughnut shop, among other establishments. At the time, my mom said it was a slave cemetery, though it is difficult to say for sure. Some stones are so rubbed down that their origins are unknown and they could, indeed, be the final resting places of people who died in slavery, including some who may have laid stones and gathered lumber for Comal Bluff.

Forgetting a Bloody Past

Whether Williamson Creek Cemetery can truly be called a slave cemetery or not, its existence, as well as its relationship to the Sneeds' antebellum estate, helps to complete a story on Austin's southern border that has largely been overlooked - a story of a time and place when and where the buying and selling of human beings for forced labor was an accepted practice, a practice that was worth fighting two wars over: the Texas Revolution and the American Civil War. With a tighter and more personal focus, the story becomes one of pain, loss, tragedy, persistence, wealth, power, family, and time, a story that was taking place on the edge of the Texas frontier in the middle of the 19th century, in places all across the Hill Country and deeper into the slaveholding regions of the state.

Considering the degree to which Comal Bluff has deteriorated, the story can also be said to be one of forgetfulness and, perhaps, regret. In some places south of the Mason-Dixon Line, the antebellum and Confederate past remains, somewhat awkwardly, still a glorious dream. Richmond, Va., the former capital of the Confederacy, has maintained Confederate President Jefferson Davis' house, and erected a museum to the Confederacy, both venues dedicated to the memory of an unfortunate history Virginians have embraced, largely because it is a history they could never realistically manage to abandon. Austin, although its history is likewise tightly intertwined with that of the Confederacy and the antebellum South, has largely managed to distance itself from what took place here when slavery was still legal, and later, when Jim Crow still menaced - when race and racial relations were more overt, virulent, and bloody affairs than they are now.

Austin has largely understated (or forgotten) its role during the years of slavery and the Civil War, but that doesn't change what actually happened. S.C. Gwynne puts it plainly in his remarkable book Empire of the Summer Moon, when he describes the mood in the city at the beginning of the war, just four years after the completion of construction on Comal Bluff: "Abraham Lincoln had been elected president the previous fall, and anti-Union sentiment in Texas was in full cry. Austin was its center." Indeed, it is likely those Civil War-era residents would recognize lingering elements of Austin's secessionist past that typically go unnoticed by 21st century Austinites.

While working on this story, for example, I was reminded that some statues on the Capitol grounds as well as the University of

Texas campus are specifically dedicated to "heroes" of the Glorious Cause. A page on the UT website refers to statues of Jefferson Davis and Confederate Generals Robert E. Lee and Albert Sidney Johnston as an "honor court." I do not know what an "honor court" is, but it does sound sufficiently Southern. Fittingly, these statues are located on the campus' South Mall and, equally fitting, they face south. The statue of Jefferson Davis is especially noble, standing at the foot of the UT Tower in rank with Presidents George Washington and Woodrow Wilson, looking toward the Capitol Building, location of both the Confederate Soldiers Memorial (erected in 1903 on the south side) and the Hood's Texas Brigade Memorial (erected in 1910). It is as though President Davis is still giving orders and surveying territory for the rebellion.

even now I have no firm grasp of what the house means to the city, aside from its being an unmistakable reminder of the way years pass and times change. The house seems to have been built for an era that ceased to exist almost before the building was finished. Since then, days, months, and years have rolled over it like tides, unstoppable, and our memories have gone with it.

Beauty and Horror

Like anyone else alive today, I have no real knowledge of what black American slavery was like before the Civil War, in Austin or anywhere else. I only know that it was a degrading and miserable manifestation of human cruelty, a three-century holocaust whose legacy continues to darken social, economic, and political dialogue across the nation.

I have passed these monuments innumerable times and, to my discredit, never stopped to truly consider what they referred to until now. I can distinctly recall noting that it was odd to see a memorial to Confederate soldiers on the Capitol lawn when the Confederacy had lost the war, but odd is all it seemed to me. Even more preposterous, and more telling of the degree to which I was unable to recognize the significance of what was right in front of me, is that I graduated from Albert Sidney Johnston High School. The tragic irony of a high school in a predominantly Mexican-American neighborhood being named after a high-ranking Confederate commander is almost as rich - or tasteless - as that of a house built by slaves existing within the confines of Dove Springs, another mostly Mexican-American neighborhood. (The high school has since been renamed Eastside Memorial.)

I lived in the shadow of Comal Bluff for most of my life, and would like to think that I am somewhat more enlightened, and can comprehend the situation of the crumbled plantation on Austin's southeast side. But

I have always wanted to climb the fence surrounding the house's ruins to get a good look at them, wander among the rubble and trash I'd surely find there, but I don't know what I might actually learn by doing so. Even reading articles and looking at pictures seem to have the same result as going on a ghost hunt, searching constantly for an ultimate answer to something that has already said its piece, though softly: You cannot know. It is a haunting claim to consider, especially for those dedicated to saving the house, who have suggested plans for memorializing it. Personally, I am a fan of these ideas. I ache to see the house maintained, for what is left of it to be conserved for public display. I do believe there is something in the object, something to be learned, something we need, especially in the South, a seat of American beauty and American horror.

As I mentioned above, I wanted this Sneed House story to be different from those that have come before it. In retrospect, that was a terribly pompous statement. It first suggests that I might have had the time and initiative to read everything that has ever been written on the house (in fact, there

does not appear to have been much, so I may have come close to doing this). It then suggests I might be able to stumble on some angle that no other writer or reporter has previously considered. I would like to believe that by adding my words to the conversation, a tide of new interest might bring the house out of the catacombs of Austin's cultural awareness and into the light for good, turning it into a popular attraction like the Alamo or Monticello (the former home of President Thomas Jefferson, another slaveowner. Austin's leadership could perhaps learn a lesson from that Virginia plantation, an example of a memorial that is determined not to forget its roots in human bondage) - that somehow I will be doing a small part to reclaim a bit of important history.

These seem worthy goals, but unlikely to be achieved. This story has been less about the house itself, than about the tendency of events to be replaced by more events until all or most are forgotten, and only the most meager strands survive. While I would like to see the house renovated to recall some semblance of what it once was, a more conspicuous reminder of our own complex past, this is mostly out of curiosity, my personal interest in relics and legends. Ford's Theatre in D.C., where Abraham Lincoln was shot, and the Petersen House across the street, where he died a few hours later, have both been kept in a condition that is very close to what they were in 1865 when those events occurred. They include period furnishings as well as some original artifacts, such as the pillow Lincoln bled on as he was dying. I've visited these places and, to some extent, was moved by them. But even with the attention these historic places have seen, and the upkeep they have benefited from, they do not replicate the eras they have witnessed. It is this fleeting quality of lives and moments that leaves me more befuddled than outraged at the glorification of Confederates on the Texas Capitol grounds, or the subtle, determined nudging of Comal Bluff toward oblivion.

I described the house as having been "marred" by graffiti. Perhaps it is appropriate that it is so. After all, what amount of allegiance to a 19th century slaveowning family's home could a modern teenager, most likely a racial minority, be expected to have? What is unfortunate may be not that the graffiti exists, but that it is more blind deviance than political gesture, an artifact of economic and social disparities which are themselves a product of America's legacy of inequality. These economic and social structures are far more sinister, and much harder to ignore, than a crumbling foundation on the south side of town.

I can write my story, but in the face of the years, those before me and the ones to come long after I've gone, I am powerless. This story, like the Sneeds, might briefly shine a light on a corner of Austin – but after a few days, that light will fade, and the story will retreat to the margins to haunt the legacy of the house ... another ghost.

The house will stay where it is, on an unnamed portion of acreage at the edge of civilization, destined for demolition, primed to be forgotten.



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

NEW EASTSIDE PERFORMANCE VENUE DEBUTS WITH CHADDICK DANCE THEATER'S 'TURNED INSIDE OUT'

Partnering: Dancers do it all the time in performance, and the results are often wonderful. So why shouldn't dance companies do the same in business?

That's what Cheryl Chaddick of Chaddick Dance Theater and Katherine Hodges of Ready|Set|Go! wondered. After more than five years each of presenting dance in various venues around Austin and tiring of trying to solve the perennial problem of where to rehearse and perform, these local troupes decided a pas de deux was better than a pair of solos. So they teamed up to found a new venue for movement classes and performance: First Street Studio.

The 1,400-square-foot space where East Cesar Chavez crosses Pedernales contains

just the kind of features that matter to a contemporary dance company: wall-to-wall mirrors, a true sprung unfinished wood floor, ceilings more than 25 feet high, a lighting grid, a sound system, a custom-fitted scrim, and audience seating for 50-75 people. Chaddick and Hodges tricked it out with so many goodies not just to benefit their own companies, but so other local dance companies and small arts groups of all kinds could have a complete, well-equipped, accessible venue to rent for classes, rehearsals, and performances. (Plans are to rent by the hour, with rates based on time of day and amount of time rented. The studio becomes available this summer. For more information, visit www.firststreetstudio.net.)

Of course, the founders get first crack at showing what First Street is like as a performance venue. For the studio's debut. Chaddick Dance Theater is presenting Turned Inside Out, the latest edition of the company's annual spring showcase of original choreography. Chaddick has created two works: "Right to Wrong to Right," an examination of family dynamics and the ways that moms, dads, and siblings influence the development

of one's identity, set around a dinner table; and "The Perfect Offering," a look at how women's views of femininity, beauty, and power are shaped – and warped – by such idealized female figures as ballerina dolls and slender mannequins. Hodges will also

offer a pair of shorts: "Someone to Hold Onto," a romantic duet, and "Wallflowers," a story of two women striving to engage more. And rounding out the program will be Lindsey Taylor of Little Stolen Moments with the piece "Jupiter," which combines movement with film, animation, music, and actors, and is set in a bizarre, psychedelic, allfemale future society. We won't even hazard a guess as to how things turn out

Collective Strength


The 2014 class of the Austin Arts Hall of Fame

That there is strength in numbers is common knowledge, but there can also be inspiration in numbers. And resourcefulness. And transformational change. That's the lesson from this year's inductees into the Austin Arts Hall of Fame. In the honor's 13-year history, the Austin Critics Table has traditionally recognized individuals and couples, but for 2014 the informal affiliation of arts writers has selected three groups, entities in which gifted artists have banded together to make work and other contributions to the community, and achieved more collectively than they might have alone. All three have not only made Austin's cultural scene more vibrant, they've also changed the face of that scene and even the way that scene is viewed around the state and across the country. They stand beside the 100-plus artists, educators, patrons, and arts advocates whose pioneering efforts in nurturing visual art, dance, theatre, and classical music in Austin have already earned them a place in the Hall of Fame. The Class of 2014 will be inducted during the Austin Critics Table Awards ceremony on Monday, June 2, 7pm, at Cap City Comedy Club, 8120 Research. Here is an introduction to the latest honorees and why we honor them.

Blue **Genie Art Industries**

Magic has nothing to do with the success of Blue Genie - the artistmakers inside the 10,000-square-foot warehouse Springdale are simply among the hardest-working creatives in town but the art they produce has always been enchanting.



city's look. Along the way, it's also managed



to support local visual artists, through the Blue Genie Art Bazaar, an art sale that's now a holiday tradition; exhibits of artists' work in its space; and community events such as the Blue Genie Danger Derby.

Big Medium



Road became a model for making an industrial site into an affordable multiple-artist studio/exhibition space, and that led to the development of the recent studio/gallery complex Canopy. And through Big Medium, they've helped artists have places to show that work, in the galleries at Bolm Studios and Canopy, and to sell that work, in EAST and its spring sibling, the West Austin Studio Tour. They've supported a host of smaller projects, too - the art publications Cantanker and Pastelegram, the art competition Eyes Got It!, the ART From the Ashes show after the Bastrop fire - but even when an idea has been improbably ambitious - "Hey, why don't we start a biennial juried exhibition of art from all over Texas?" - Big Medium has found a way to make it happen and make it work. Most artists work in paint or clay or stone; these artists work in community - a truly big medium in which their creations have made a huge impact.



Rude Mechanicals

Longevity isn't expected among theatre companies started by a pack of friends in their 20s who insist on making every decision collectively, and yet here are the Rude Mechanicals on the cusp of their 20th year together, with the five founders (Kirk Lynn, Madge Darlington, Sarah Richardson, Lana Lesley, and Shawn Sides) still at the helm and still poring over every choice as a team. The intensity of collaboration that causes so many art gangs to flame out so soon has, like a Maccabean miracle, kept the

Rudes' light burning longer and more brightly than is natural, as seen in their two dozen company-created plays, including Requiem for Tesla, Lipstick Traces, Get Your War On, I've Never Been So Happy, and The Method Gun. Part of a generation of troupes that lit a fire under local theatre in the Nineties, the Rudes broke rules and bucked convention with shows that were original, funny, and inventively theatrical; but what distinguished them was that shared sensibility underpinning every show: curious, contentious, mischievous,

and generous. It earned them scores of awards: national acclaim. with The New York Times' Margo Jefferson declaring the Rudes to be one of three companies in the U.S. making theatre that matters: national and international tours (most recently, Stop Hitting Yourself's six-week run at Lincoln Center); and being named resident o theatre company at UT. But they continue to make work in Austin, a city to which they feel deeply tied. ¬ (See El Paraiso.) And they give No back to the city, making their Eastside warehouse-turned-perfor-

mance venue, the Off Center, available to other arts groups (often for less than they can afford), co-producing theatre with other companies, and helping teen girls express themselves creatively via their Grrl Action program. Never as rough, unlettered, or theatrically inept as their amateur-thespian namesakes in A Midsummer Night's *Dream*, the Rudes are like the Bard's creations in this: They're honest laborers who work with their hands, and what they make is crafted with care.

The Suicide

Remember Easter when you were a kid, gazing into that magical, secret world of the sugar egg? Paper Chairs' set for The Suicide inspires a childlike sense of awe, and set designer Lisa Laratta proves herself again to be one of the most talented artists working in the field today. Meticulously balanced geometric elements typified by exquisite attention to detail in both color and texture give the viewer clues that Laratta is an artist in the truest sense of the word. Here, her background in and mastery of painting, graphic design, and art history spring vividly to life in the 3-D world of Russian depressive Semyon Semyonovich Podsekalnikov. In addition, Laratta and Elizabeth Doss make a swell co-directing duo, and many of their blocking decisions are inventive - key in helping audiences engage with the dated and otherwise culturally alienating material of this 85-year-old satire of early Soviet culture.

Lighting designers Natalie George and Jen Rogers round out this brilliant technical team with support from technical directors Mason

Baker and Simon Ghezzi. Although the play is long and takes place in front of a single backdrop, George and Rogers' expert lighting decisions make this solid set adaptable, transforming a whimsical palette into a bleak wasteland of gray, as appropriate to the characters' changing states of mind.


If you're thinking you might not feel up to the emotional demands of a play about suicide, think again. Despite the heavy title, Nikolai Erdman's play is really a black comedy cum political satire. Written at the onset of the Stalinist regime, it was banned by Soviet authorities, the playwright was exiled to Siberia, and the influential director, Vsevolod Meyerhold, was executed amid dubious claims of espionage. Thus, mocking lines like "In the old days, people with ideas were willing to die for them!" sting. Yet it's a helpful kind of hurt as the suicidal protagonist, Semyon, listens thoughtfully to a host of impassioned lobbyists as they tell him not to refrain from taking his own life, but to do it with purpose. It's difficult for Americans to wrap their heads around such oppressive circumstances, but wonderful stagings such as this one can serve as an uplifting wake - an opportunity to applaud these artists and their tremendous sacrifices.



While this is not a musical per se, the music (including original tunes by Laura Freeman) is remarkable, with performers playing the banjo, guitar, tuba, violin - and singing together playfully. This ensemble work figures into several dramatic moments as well, particularly in act two, when most of the large cast is onstage en masse. Casting

on the whole is spot on, with a nice variety of types, ages, and ethnicities. As Semyon's delightfully bumfuzzled mother-in-law, grande dame Lana Dieterich holds on to her crown as a crowd-pleaser.

Where else can you get a history lesson from a priest in high heels? Put this on your list of things to do. - Stacy Alexander Smith



Southwest Voices St. Theresa Catholic Church. 4311 Small May 17

Eat local, drink local, shop local ... listen local? Southwest Voices, presented by Chorus Austin's Austin Vocal Arts Ensemble, encouraged us to do just that with a program showcasing choral works by 10 Texan composers, including two of AVAE's members. The concert closed Chorus Austin's 49th season with proof that there is plenty of homegrown talent to celebrate.

The 39-voice chorus started with Abby Gostein's "Vayarotz Likratam," with text from Genesis about Abraham's "audacious hospitality." Its repetition of the Hebrew phrase of welcome, bruchim ha-baim, was echoed by the physical embrace of "surround sound" created by the chorus' semicircular formation. Next came a setting of "Ave Maria" by chorus member Stephanie Andrews. This tranquil music, inspired by the plainchant tradition, began with a single soprano voice and slowly added voices to create a velvety crescendo. The beaming smile on Andrews' face during the applause was truly one of the highlights of the evening for me. Another high point was the world premiere of "Let Evening Come" by UT faculty composer Donald Grantham. Written after learning of his late wife's tumor, the combination of Jane Kenyon's tender poetry and Grantham's evocative setting yielded several "goosebump moments" - particularly one soprano entrance on the word "so" that was so haunting as to warrant special mention.

The only non-Texan on the program was the winner of Chorus Austin's first-ever Young Composers Competition. Joshua Fishbein, a 29-year-old doctoral student at UCLA, beat out nearly 40 entries with "A Prep-School Boy," a playful and rich tribute to 20th century composer Benjamin Britten that takes its text from a short note by Britten in the

introduction to his Simple Symphony. In what Fishbein calls "a very literal musical interpretation" of the text, he took the idea of "text painting" to a new level; the word "minor" is obviously outlined by a minor chord, and the initials "E.B." are sung on those respective pitches. The thrilling harmonic changes felt like riding a roller coaster in the dark, keeping listeners at the edges of their seats for the unexpected swerves.

While the pieces ran the gamut of style and theme, they were strung together by thoughtful yet informal remarks by Artistic Director/Conductor Ryan Heller. This is how concerts ought

to be: exploratory, casual, and, perhaps most importantly, built on passion. AVAE isn't a professional choir, but it's good. And though there's an occasional rhythmical hiccup here and there, it's easily forgiven and forgotten because of the generous and joyful spirit that's brought

to the music. In his opening comments, Heller remarked that he wants to show that "classical music isn't something that died in the 19th century," and indeed, AVAE placed the stethoscope right on Texas and amplified its pulsating heartbeat. - Natalie Zeldin

'Peppermint Doorstop' Co-Lab N Space, 905 Congress Through June 30

At its core, great art makes you think, but often that introspective process is confined to subject matter that feels serious. We navigate the depths of the human experience through paintings and explore loss in photography: This is the gravity we anticipate art holding.

Matthew John Winters has gleefully thrown all that aside in "Peppermint Doorstop" at Co-Lab's N Space Downtown. Instead of belaboring the sullen, Winters relishes creating art that is simply fun. His candy-coated motif began with tagging the red and white swirls around Austin (you can catch some at the HOPE Outdoor Gallery on Baylor), but the exhibition lets Winters take his sweet subject matter and diversify the audience experience through photographs, sculpture, painting, and even custom, vinyl-cut stickers.

Gallery attendees are first greeted with Winters' larger inclusions, namely photographs which depict his sculpted peppermints and various other commercial items in discreet locations. The images further nurture the idea of remoteness in the art world, but instead of an emotional revelation tucked into an image, you are confronted with a comically constructed block of cheese sitting atop a kitchen counter. Throughout the space, Winters offers audiences a chance to interact with the various sculp-

tures, including a jovial pile of peppermints sitting adjacent to their cheesy sculptural counterparts.

Audiences, one word of warning: Don't let the lightheartedness of Winters' work distract you from his expert craftsmanship. "Peppermint Doorstop" is equally amusing and intelligent, with an altogether refreshing perspective.

world, where voluptuousness is celebrated and the big reveal is often a show-stopping "titty-twirl." (Having trouble picturing it? Think of the strip club scene in *The Graduate*.) The first time she peeled down was an incredibly vulnerable moment. But over time Ramsay found that the form's emphasis on individuality encouraged her to play to her strengths and develop her own personal (and quite leggy) style. Ultimately, burlesque values virtuosity and theatrics over any particular body shape, and that turned out to be "tremendously validating."

And by the way, that move that shocked Katharine Ross? "Turns out to have nothing to do with size."

The willingness to find their own strengths by being vulnerable onstage was quintessential for the cast, many of whom entered the show with improv experience but little or no dance background. Ramsay and Majcher - who emcees the show with a hammy French accent, suspenders, and a ringmaster's gusto - brought in local burlesque stars Coco Lectric and Jolie Goodnight of the Jigglewatts to show the cast a few moves, and choreographer Carissa McAtee worked with them in rehearsals for months before the show opened. But ultimately, when each night's featured performer takes the stage for those fully improvised burlesque numbers, she does it alone, accompanied only by Tosin Awofeso's improvised music. (And even he gets to sit behind a keyboard.)

Improvisors do have one natural advantage in the burlesque game: They are trained to interact with and feed off the energy of the audience. Burlesque performers will tell you that built into the form is the power to turn

the tables on spectators by teasing them, scolding them, and refusing

to give them their pound of flesh until they've demonstrated sufficient enthusiasm on the performer's terms, thankyou-very-much. A seasoned burlesque dancer can have the audience eating out of her hand with the flick of an eyebrow. Though burlesque undoubtedly puts women's bodies on display, it always does so with an emphasis on the danc-

er's own pleasure in her skill and delight in her own body.

I must admit, it looks like they're having the time of their lives up there. As a regular at the local chapter of the women-only freestyle dance-stravaganza **Dance Dance**Party Party, I got over my own inhibitions on the dance floor to the tune of **Beyoncé** and **Ke\$ha** rather than a jangly piano, but it's much the same thing. At this point, the pasties don't scare me nearly as much as the improv.

V Is for Vulnerability

What is it about pasties, those sequined bulls-eyes, those tiny boob yarmulkes of burlesque? Is it their magical, seemingly contradictory ability both to reveal and conceal the same square inch – well, circular inch – of flesh? Or is it the way they always seem to be winking at you, saying, "You're seeing it all, well not all-all, but something better, sparklier, tassle-ier"?

Pasties aren't the only tool in the toolkit of modern-day theatrical burlesque – often called "neo-burlesque" – even if they are among the most titillating. Arguably more important is the dancer's connection with the audience, a collaborative rapport that has to be forged between performer and spectator in the moment. This makes improv and burlesque a natural fit, according to **Jayme Ramsay**, codirector with **Marc Majcher** of **Hurly Burly**, a burlesque-themed improv show that contains burlesque performances actually improvised on the spot. Complete with feather fans,

G-strings, pasties, and lots and lots of laughs, the show presents an old-fashioned backstage narrative of cabaret life that owes more to Gypsy Rose Lee and Barbara Stanwyck than it does to Christina Aguilera and Cher.

Ramsay discovered her own passion for burlesque in 2006, when, still new to Austin, she began dancing as part of a troupe called **Raw Sugar**. It's probably no coincidence that the fictional cabaret in Hurly Burly is called the **Sugar Bowl**; the show is suffused with her warmth and enthusiasm for the empowering aspect of burlesque.

"Burlesque is validating," Ramsay says, and adds, paratactically, "Burlesque is vulnerable."

The two V-words turn out to be related. For instance, Ramsay herself initially worried that her tall, reedy figure, which garners her a certain baseline of social approval in the outside world, wouldn't be an asset in the burlesque





Good Mexico City Food Has a Home on the Eastside

The little cottage that formerly housed Papi Tino's is now home to a new venture from two local service industry veterans. Daniel O. Brooks, former general manager at Vespaio and Mettle, has partnered with Claude Benayoun, one of Vespaio's co-owners, to realize his dream of a comfortable cantina featuring Mexico City-style botanas. Although we think there's still room for improvement, so far we are enchanted with Licha's.

Most of the rustic Mexican theme of the former tenant has carried over, and there's a homey vibe that distinguishes Licha's from other establishments in the area – for instance, the staff is attentive and enthusiastic. The bar program, overseen personally by Brooks, features excellent libations, including staples like Palomas (\$4); classics with a twist, like La Mula (\$7), blending mezcal, ginger beer, fresh lime, and Jugo Maggi; and original cocktails like the refreshing El Zorro (\$10), tequila infused with chile ancho and chipotle, fresh grapefruit juice, and sparkling Rosé.

The small menu is packed with inventive cuisine, a combination of street-food staples and popular cantina dishes, with a quality that shows from the first bite of chips and salsa. The enormous quesadillas (\$10) come in blue corn tortillas – the closest to indigenous tortillas I've had in Austin – filled with asadero cheese accompanied by epazote, huitlacoche, or flor de Jamaica (sautéed hibiscus blossoms). We loved the sopes de lengua (\$12), three fresh masa cups

filled with braised tongue, fresh avocado salsa, and queso fresco, but were less enamored of the tlacoyo (\$10). The shrimp *mole* topping was excellent, but the tlacoyo (traditional oval masa boat) was too big and thick, and therefore undercooked in the middle. Tacos (\$14) come in individual cast-iron skillets, sizzling with toppings such as carne al pastor with pineapple slivers or roasted duck with orange supremes, accompanied by handmade tortillas (also inconsistent in thickness and done-

ness). From the cazuelitas (\$12-\$15) we recommend the exquisite pulpo con chorizo (octopus with sausage) and delicious cochinita pibil (pork with achiote and orange juice). If you have room for dessert, the traditional flan is an absolute winner.

Even though I'd suggest some adjustments to the fresh masa offerings, Licha's has become one of my favorite places to meet friends for dinner and drinks – and should be my go-to place to watch the upcoming World Cup.

The addition of multiple trailers from one vendor and the transition into brick-and-mortar is further evidence of the evolution in our vibrant local food trailer scene. Take Micklethwait Craft Meats (1309 Rosewood), for instance. They added a party/special-events trailer for the official trailer food court during South by Southwest and now use it for catering. Current plans call for them to add a third trailer at another location, which will sell deli meats and sandwiches. Tom Micklethwait and new employee Bobby Lovelett (formerly of Vespaio) will head to New York City in July to check out the deli scene there and return to open their deli trailer soon afterward. The guys at Micklethwait are also expanding their days and hours of operation; go by the barbecue trailer Tuesdays-Saturdays, 11am-8pm, and Sundays, 11am-3pm.

In other barbecue trailer news, **Mark Avalos** of **SLAB BBQ** (W. 24th & San Antonio) has added a mobile food truck for corporate lunch service and event catering (look for them at this weekend's **RedFest**), and he's moving up to a brick-and-mortar spot, as well. By midsummer, he expects to be smoking meats and preparing sides in the former Texas Rib Kings (9012 Research Ste. C-4) location. While he plans to keep the campus-area trailer in operation, the new spot will be a full-service restaurant with foods made from scratch and products from local vendors, including Maine Root sodas, Moonshine Sweet Tea, L'il Mama's Buns, and award-winning pies from Cutie Pies.

And last, but certainly not least, the Vasquez sisters of **Veracruz All Natural** will soon have three trailers and a brick-and-mortar outlet. Aficionados of their First Plates award-winning migas taco will be pleased to know their current trailers (1704 E. Cesar Chavez, 1700 E. Sixth) will soon be joined by another Veracruz trailer in the yard at South Austin's upcoming **Radio Coffee & Beer** (4208 Manchaca Rd.) as well as their own brick-and-mortar outlet (2301 E. Cesar Chavez) with an expanded menu that will include enchiladas, sides, and a juice bar.

For the lightning round: Noble Sandwiches (4805 Burnet Rd.) has added beer and wine to its menu... **Travaasa Austin** (13500 FM 2769) has added a new bar, where they will offer mixology classes and make craft cocktails using herbs and flowers from the spa's organic farm... Fans of the wines of **Flat Creek Estate** will be pleased to know they've opened a new tasting room in the heart of Marble Falls. Flat Creek Enoteca (112 U.S. Hwy. 281) is a wine shop and tasting room featuring wine-friendly, light fare (sandwiches, salads, pizzas) and a wood-fired oven. Initially, the shop will only carry Flat Creek wines and some labels newly imported from northern Italy, but depending on sales, they would like to add some other Texas wines to their inventory.

Cookbooks and cultural conversation starters top our summer reading list

This summer's culinary reading list, both in print and online, includes new books from Texas authors, encyclopedic explorations of international cuisines, plus food-focused memoir and fiction. Pick up some helpful kitchen hints, be inspired to travel to the peninsulas of Mexico, Spain, and Thailand, or just take a staycation with some very engaging light reading. - Virginia B. Wood

Man Made Meals: The Essential Cookbook for Guys by Steven Raichlen Workman Publishing, 640 pp., \$22.95



It's because

Steven Raichlen is the savant who wrote The Barbecue! Bible and hosts PBS' Primal Grill and has already won five James Beard Awards for his cookbooks: That's why you can roll your eyes, if necessary, at the gender-specific bias of his new Man Made Meals book that's marketed to men - who are previously ignorant of kitchen skills due, it seems, to their possession of a Y chromosome (or, perhaps the rationalization would run, due to the typical parental and societal bullshit resultant therefrom). You can roll your eyes, and then you can do yourself a favor and buy a copy of Man Made Meals anyway.

Seriously. Because, in spite of the goofiness of occasional statements like "As for cupcakes, they really aren't guy food," Raichlen is no strident masculinist here or elsewhere; his affable, conversational tone focuses on the business at hand. He's like a longtime buddy who has a couple of libraries' worth of knowledge, the experience to back that knowledge up, and a rightfully acclaimed ability to share that knowledge. Man Made Meals is an introduction to cooking (and an exploration of several of the more "guy-centric" possibilities of cooking) that is so well-presented and so enjoyably informative, it's just as well that it's targeting a specific niche: General cookbooks couldn't bear competition like this.

Raichlen smartly shows you how best to navigate and stock a kitchen and how to make use of the trade's necessary tools; he lays out the basics that a person needs to know about cooking, and then he presents recipe after recipe of mouthwatering goodness for every daypart you don't sleep through. Each presentation is an extension of the man's conversational vibe, now revealing in simple, practical steps how to commit each recipe, including hints and tips gleaned from his decades of cooking, and prefaced with brief, sometimes anecdotal bits that provide welcome context for what you're about to prepare. Brioche French toast. BLT salad. Thai bar snacks. Lemon soy London broil. Pork chops paprikas. Bourbon-brined roast turkey. Bacon-wrapped scallops. Mexican chocolate pudding. The list goes on, the recipes enlighten, and eventually your kitchen smells like heaven.


Bonus: numerous full-color photo spreads of prep methods, showing exactly what you

Yucatán: Recipes From a Culinary Expedition by David Sterling University of Texas Press, 576 pp., \$60

David Sterling is the owner/chef-instructor of the renowned Los Dos cooking school in Mérida, Mexico, run from within his restored colonial home. It's a total immersion experience, with tours of markets, street vendors, restaurants, food producers, etc. He has taught for years, and knows the foods and culture of the Yucatán as only a native can. Sterling has managed to transfer that vast culinary knowledge into the seminal work on Yucatecan cuisine in the English language. At over 500 pages, and loaded with more than 275 easily accessible, authentic, and delicious recipes, the book would be a masterpiece even without the sumptuous photographs that grace almost every page. Sterling's Yucatán may be food porn at the highest level, but at its heart, it's a definitively delicious cookbook.

Sterling explains every aspect of a dish in detail - its history and regional variations, the way the ingredients are produced, the difference between restaurant and home cook production, and each step of its preparation and cooking process; by the time you sample the fantastic flavors, you'll be convinced you're there in Valladolid, Campeche, Celestún, or Oxcutzcab. The entire peninsula is covered in depth, from the seafood obtained from a thousand miles of coastline. to the agricultural treasures of the milpa, scrubland, and forest.

Whether you're cooking toasted pumpkinseed dip, pork belly confit, venison salad. chicken livers in smoky tomato sauce, duck with honey-anise sauce, roasted chiles stuffed with seafood, egg enchiladas in squash seed-tomato sauce, or Mayan chocolate frozen custard, the dishes are easy to cook in any American kitchen (this is, after all, a primitive cuisine that started well over



2,000 years ago). Some of the ingredients can be esoteric, but sources and substitutes are provided. When you're through reading this cookbook, you'll know the Yucatecan pantry inside-out and feel qualified as an expert on the cuisine.

Rarely has the food and culture of an area and its people been so exhaustively chronicled and revealed in such a satisfying fashion. I am seldom as impressed with a cookbook as I have been with Sterling's Yucatán. There may be a bit of sticker shock, but trust me, it would be a steal at twice the - Mick Vann price.

need to do. Bonus: a section on cocktails near the end of the gorgeous, oversize paperback volume. Bonus: between-chapters profiles/interviews with a small crowd of famous "Food Dudes" - Michael Pollan, Stanley Tucci, Thomas Keller, and more.

Conclusion: Steven Raichlen's Man Made Meals is such a great basic cookbook, I'm getting a second copy – for my daughter.

Delicious!: A Novel by Ruth Reichl Random House. 400 pp., \$27

Ruth Reichl is one of the most successful food writers of her generation, with a résumé that includes positions as both restaurant critic and food editor

of the Los Angeles Times, restaurant critic of The New York Times, and editor-in-chief of Gourmet magazine. During this time, she also managed to put out three very successful memoirs, Tender at the Bone, Garlic and Sapphires, and Comfort Me With Apples. When Condé Nast closed the venerable 68-year-old Gourmet in 2009 due to declining ad sales, Reichl finally turned her hand to writing fiction. Delicious! is her first novel.

I've always been a fan of Reichl's, keeping an eye on her food section and her reviewing style when possible, and I was impressed with the list of writers she attracted to Gourmet in her tenure there. I found her memoirs to be luxurious indulgences, and

came away from Garlic and Sapphires realizing that absent disguises, I just wasn't working hard enough at my job as a restaurant critic. That book read like fiction, and I'm not at all surprised there's talk of turning it into a movie. So, I was already primed to appreciate Reichl's fiction, and she didn't disappoint.

Reichl's heroine is California girl Billie Breslin, who leaves Santa Barbara for New York and snags a plum job as executive assistant to Jake Newberry, editor of the country's oldest food magazine, Delicious! Billie's new world comes complete with mysteries (what happened to her beloved sister, why a woman with her discerning palate won't cook, why the James Beard letters were hidden in the Delicious! library) and fascinating characters (the quirky staff at Delicious!, the family and customers at Fontanari's Italian food shop where she picks up weekend shifts, the elusive Lulu Swan). Through Billie, we get a mouthwatering discovery of New York's culinary scene, as well as insight into the inner workings of a major food publication. There's romance, intrigue, food history, and the fictional appearance of a very real American culinary icon, James Beard. Take Ruth and Billie along on vacation this summer. They are worthwhile companions. – Virginia B. Wood

Okra **by Virginia Willis** U. of North Carolina Press, 120 pp., \$18

This slender volume is the eighth installment in the Savor the South series of cookbooks put out by UNC Press. Each book is about a single Southern food or beverage, and previous books have focused on buttermilk, bourbon, tomatoes, biscuits, peaches,



and pecans. To further sweeten the pot, each book is authored by award-winning food writers and chefs. This volume piqued my curiosity for two reasons: It was written by Virginia Willis, the renowned author of Bon Appétit, Y'all, and also because, like many gardeners who grow okra, I only know

a few ways to cook it.


This book takes care of that problem. Recipes for cooking okra are collected here, culled not only from the American South. but from all over the world. Southern-fried okra, okra and tomatoes, seafood gumbo, and corn-and-okra pudding are joined by African chicken stew with okra and peanuts. Moroccan lamb and okra tangine, Jamaican curried shrimp and okra, and Indian okra and potatoes in green masala, to name a few. The recipes are clear and well-researched, never straying into the overly fussy. Willis is a stickler for authenticity, and is respected for her concise, approachable style.

Willis also provides a history of okra, botanical information, descriptions of okra varieties, and gardening tips. Though this book is slender, it packs a curiously large punch: The dross of the unnecessary has been left out, and all the truly useful information remains. It is a tribute to excellent research, writing, and editing. Perhaps the most telling thing I can say is this: I now want to buy all the other books in the series. - Kate Thornberry

A is for Absinthe: A Spirited Book of ABCs by Lara Nixon Illustrated by Casey Barber Self-published (available for purchase at www.aisforabsinthe.com), 38 pp., \$18.95

Walk into any bar in Austin and you're likely to see them. Ditto for most any liquor store in town. And don't even get me started on the major distribution channels. I'm talking about the folks in town who slave over every detail, from providing the main ingredients to preparation to serving alcohol-based drinks. Check out the bartenders, servers, and shop workers. The vast majority are of the age for child rearing. Lara Nixon - the award-winning drink designer, educator, and co-founder of Bad Dog Bar Craft - has created a book that is made for mommies and daddies who work in the liquor industry and want something to read to their children that sort of leads to an explanation of what they do when they leave the house. She's targeting a niche market for sure, but a pretty darn big one.

This book is subversive in the most diabolical way. Can you imagine the livid response Ms. Nixon would get from most of Texas other



than our little blue area? I can just see some member of the Daughters of the Republic with her head exploding while she is reading a child's prim-

er on cocktails! Both Nixon's cute little poetic statements and Barber's colorful illustrations are sure to attract children, but there's also something here for adults. Besides being cute, the interaction of words and art is often hilarious and howlingly ironic. On top of everything else, it is cultivated and sophisticated. Imagine your 4-year-old telling granny that absinthe is "where the fairies come from." Highly recommended for intelligent people who like a great cocktail. And their children!

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Texas Hill Country Cuisine: Flavors From the Cabernet Grill Texas Wine Country Restaurant by Ross Burtwell and Julia Celeste Rosenfeld Creative Noggin Press, 196 pp., \$34.95



A few years back, I had a freelance assignment to write about the Cabernet Grill's unique Hill Country cuisine, paired with the state's only 100% Texas wine list. I stayed in one of the cozy cottages at the Cotton Gin Village for the night, ate a wonderful dinner at Cabernet Grill, and had the pleasure of meeting chef/owner Ross Burtwell. So I was thrilled when I saw this cookbook, and even more so when I started browsing through it.

Burtwell enlisted the help of an excellent San Antonio food writer, Julia Celeste Rosenfeld, to share his story and recipes with the world, and the result is a book that resonates from the heart. Loaded with beautiful images, the book captures the essence of Burtwell's passion for all things Hill Country, his love and support for Texas wineries, and the recipes that have made the Cabernet Grill a unique travel destination. Interspersed with the recipes are insightful notations, tips on preparations and ingredients, and very special nods to the local producers from whom he sources his ingredients. From Hill Country quail to Pure Luck goat cheese to Texas rice, Burtwell and Rosenfeld give credit where credit is due. And of course, they offer his picks for pairing the dishes with Texas wines – the restaurant currently pours 90 different selections from 31 Texas wines is a contraction.

I was as pleased as a Fredericksburg peach to find recipes for the memorable warm Texas goat cheese appetizer and honey lavender peach crisp, alongside 129 other dishes I would love to make – or have someone else make for me. It is clear that this book is a labor of love, many years in the making. Pair it with a bottle of Texas wine for the perfect gift for homesick Texans and faraway fans alike. I look forward to cooking some of these recipes, following Burtwell's passion for the rich culinary heritage he so proudly demonstrates. And I think a return visit to the Cabernet Grill is also in order.

Canning, Pickling and Freezing With Irma Harding: Recipes to Preserve Food, Family and the American Way by Marilyn McCray Octane Press, 256 pp., \$22.95

When Irma Harding, the beloved trademark character of International Harvester's home appliances, was introduced in 1948, ours was a country building itself up postwar, when victory gardens fed families and home refrigeration was the latest in modern home technology. With Canning, Pickling and Freezing With Irma Harding, local food writer and vintage collector Marilyn McCray is reintroducing Irma and updating her recipes for a new batch of home cooks. As Michael Perry puts it in the book's foreword, "A resurrected icon of hardy Americana, [Irma] is intended to appeal across genders and generations."



Easily searchable for ideas, the
book is reminiscent
of decades-old
handwritten recipe
cards and clipouts, now yellowed
and frayed or filed
away in a dusty
box. Only these
recipes are shiny
and new, with
safer food-handling
practices. It's all
about pickles and

relishes, jams and jellies, freezing and refrigerating, drying, smoking, and fermenting. There is a chapter apiece for fruits, vegetables, and tomatoes, plus a slew of time-honored recipes with short ingredient lists. Instead of food photography, the book features old pictures, quotes from

"Irma" in an old-fashioned font, and step-bystep instructions with black-and-white graphics. This book is ideal for individuals who know their way around a kitchen, at least in rudimentary fashion, and anyone with an overabundance of produce and a penchant for the past.

McCray includes recipe contributions from several Central Texas favorites, such as Amy Crowell of the Wild Edible Texas website out of Wimberley and Stephanie McClenny of Confituras. A few summery recipes that caught my eye are pickled watermelon rind from Jesse Griffiths and Tamara Mayfield of Dai Due, and the smoke-dried tomato jam from Sonya Coté of Eden East, using Boggy Creek farmer Larry Butler's smoke-dried tomatoes (recipe also included). And because freezers were the name of her game, McCray resurrects Irma Harding herself to contribute recipes like ice cream pie. "Freezing is quick and convenient. It's so easy to package frozen food the right way. It's modern food magic," says Irma. So, although the Fifties homemaker advertising image initially seems laden with outdated associations, the lovely catch is this: Learning to update a daily activity – such as cooking – to be both efficient and enjoyable is the modern way. - Jessi Cape



The Homesick Texan's Family Table: Lone Star Cooking From My Kitchen to Yours by Lisa Fain

Ten Speed Press, 288 pp., \$29.99

Food blogger Lisa Fain, a Texas native who moved to New York in the mid-Nineties, start-

ed her blog (www.homesicktexan.com) in 2005 as a way to share recipes and stories from her Texas upbringing. Since then, Fain published her first blog-to-cookbook in 2011. Fain's second book, The Homesick Texan's Family Table, doubles down on her claim that cheese enchiladas are just food - it's the act of sharing them with family that makes them special. Indeed, I imagine serving the Crazy Nachos

featured on the cover at a Friday Night Lightswatching party and reveling in deep layers of nostalgia for bygone fall days under warm Texan skies.

Most of the recipes in the cookbook are special-occasion or splurge meals. While the chicken spaghetti is rich and flavorful, with

four cups of cheese, it is very much a "sometimes food." But I will definitely be adding the beer-battered catfish tacos into rotation for the summer months. The batter had excellent flavor that wasn't lost when I opted to bake, rather than fry, the fish; the accompanying cabbage slaw was exceptional, helping to round out a light evening meal. Great Grandma

Blanche's Chocolate Muffins combine deep chocolate flavor with a touch of cinnamon; while they turned out a bit dense, they make for a nice lunchbox or afterschool treat. Bring Mom's Raspberry Bars to your next dinner party and prepare to win hearts and minds.

Fain's personal stories and brightly colored photographs of Texan life and landscapes poignantly flank the regional recipes;

we've all got a relative (likely a grandma, mother, or beloved aunt) whose recipes we associate with growing up in this state. If nothing else, this Family Table will inspire a deeper appreciation for the meals those women served with love. - Melanie Haupt

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

Local: The New Face of Food and Farming in America by Douglas Gayeton Harper Design, 272 pp., \$35

Douglas Gayeton took his daughter to Devil's Gulch in Marin County, Calif, Looking forward to introducing her to spawning salmon – the yearly event he joyously witnessed as a child - Gayeton was in for a disheartening revelation. There were no salmon.

Devastated by water pollution, land mismanagement, and urban sprawl, the salmon

ground had collapsed. A distinct microcosm and signifier of the dangers of environmental degradation, the salmon episode inspired Gaveton's mission to travel the country over the course of three years learning



from the foremost leaders in food and farming. Interviews with Alice Waters, Temple Grandin, Polyface Farms' guru Joel Salatin, and many other farmers, fishermen, and artisans comprise this incredibly dense guide to understanding sustainable agriculture.

With this book component of the Lexicon of Sustainability (www.lexiconofsustainability.com), the massively crowd-sourced project, which includes the award-winning short-film project with PBS aptly titled "Know Your Food," Gayeton's objective is to provide as much information as possible. Additional multimedia content can be activated through smartphones, mobile devices, or tablets, and over 200 terms are decoded, seamlessly woven amongst interviews and anecdotes. As conversational as it is informative, Local serves as a valuable resource for greenhorns first learning about food miles and communitysupported agriculture as well as seasoned advocates wanting to explore food hubs and cooperative distribution.

Divided into seven sections, the book is easily navigated and quickly devoured. Examining everything from GMOs and seed sovereignty to the politics of food and knowing your farmer, Gayeton advocates for crucial changes in the industrial food system. As environmental activist Vandana Shiva notes in

the book, "either an alternative food system will be created or the Americans will kill themselves, either from not having food or having bad food." But make no mistake: Local is about climate change. According to Gayeton, every photograph, interview, and statistic, every page of his creation, is about explaining climate change. Advising conversations within the community as a way to build consensus and create reform, Gayeton writes, "Your words can change the world." It's all intercon-

nected, after all. Anna Toon

The Nourished Kitchen: Farm-to-Table Recipes for the Traditional Foods Lifestyle by Jennifer McGruther Ten Speed Press, 320 pp., \$27.99

A food educator and advocate for sustainable agriculture, Jennifer McGruther founded the ever popular food blog Nourished Kitchen before embarking upon her latest endeavor. Based on the research of Weston A. Price, McGruther's The Nourished Kitchen focuses on nutrient-dense, tra-

ditional foods - or, as author McGruther explains, the foods of our great-greatgrandmothers. Beautifully photographed, this cookbook showcases traditional foods in 160 simple vet refined recipes.

Embracing the bounty of gardens and farms, harvested locally and prepared at home, the idea is to eat mindfully while celebrating the connection between the farmer. the cook, and ultimately, the eater. Full of bones, organs, and muscle meat galore along with raw dairy and fats such as lard and butter, The Nourished Kitchen fully embraces

old-world culinary traditions. From the divinely straightforward creamed collard greens made with butter, greens, heavy cream, onion, and nutmeg to the more complex rabbit pie with bacon and chanterelles, the book speaks to all levels of culinary prowess.

Organized into sections based on where the main ingredients are procured, recipes are found from the garden, from the pasture, from the range, from the waters, from the fields, from the wild, from the orchard. and from the larder. Though the traditional


foods movement does challenge the benefits of an exclusively plant-based diet, The Nourished Kitchen also includes mesmerizing meat-free options such as rose petal and honey ice cream, dandelion greens salad with roasted nectarines and warm red onion vinaigrette, and sourdough blueberry pancakes with buttered orange syrup. Where the book most

shines, though, is in its attention to fourlegged provisions. Considering McGruther includes recipes for stewed beef heart with root vegetables and porcini mushrooms, panfried calf's liver with bacon and onions, and pickled tongue with mustard sauce, cooks who are squeamish about working with offal should likely look elsewhere. Ultimately, this cookbook will not be for everyone. Specifically, it speaks to a growing sect of eaters looking to revive the traditions of culinary past. Broiled lamb's kidneys, anyone? - Anna Toon

When Dallas and Fort Worth **Were the Music Capitals of Texas**

THEY CAME TO DFW WITH THE BRIGHT LIGHTS ON THEIR MINDS by Kevin Curtin

"Make no mistake about it, Los Angeles and New York were the kings of the music business in the Seventies," Kirby Warnock narrates in his documentary When Dallas Rocked. "They were where you went to sign a record deal and get discovered, but Dallas is where you went if you wanted to sell records."

Warnock's hourlong doc testifies that before Austin became known as the live music capital of the world, another Texas city, 182 miles to the north, was an epicenter for radio,

Dallas' FM airwaves championed the sounds of underground rock & roll in the early Seventies with influential radio rebel KZEW - "The Zoo" - turning the impressionable Texas vouth into "Zoo Freaks" with its free-form format and eccentric radio personalities, such as John Rody, who, in the documentary, characterizes KZEW as "evangelists of lifestyle" and recalls the time he ordered listeners to mail their marijuana to the station for testing. Along with hosting massive, free concerts, the countercultural station had a hand in breaking

big artists, notably Peter Frampton, whose "Do You Feel Like We Do" had been made a regional hit by the ZEW-keepers long before Frampton Comes Alive was even released.

If prominent radio airplay wasn't enough to bring the big touring acts to Dallas in the Seventies, the insistence of record labels was. Warnock's film asserts that Dallas was the Southwest distribution hub for all the major record companies, and thus music retail was booming in the Big D, where artists like the Blackhearts and the Cars regularly made instore appearances.

Warnock, a former editor at regional rock rag Buddy magazine, also points to the prominence of the Dallas blues scene, which had a godfather in legend Freddie King and future stars in natives Jimmie and Stevie Ray Vaughan, all playing at clubs like Mother Blues.

Actor Stephen Tobolowsky (who, to this day, remains best-



recognized as Ned Ryerson in Groundhog Day), appears in When Dallas Rocked to recount the time his high school folk group, Cast of Thousands, enlisted the younger Vaughan to record guitar leads on their LP entitled A New Hi. It was the teenage guitarist's first recording session.

"I felt a sense of urgency in making the film because two of the guys I wanted to interview were dead," Warnock told the Chronicle, referring to local blues legend Bugs Henderson and

Buddy founder Stoney Burns. "I was afraid that the whole history of what happened there was going to die with all the people who were there if I didn't record it."

When Dallas Rocked premiered late last year to a sold-out crowd at Dallas' famous Texas Theatre. For its first Austin screening this Sunday, the film plays as part of a double feature with Giles McCrary's You Must Be Weird or You Wouldn't Be Here. McCrary's film documents the legendary Fort Worth club known as the Cellar.

"I'm excited to show the movie in Austin because everyone knows it's the center of music, but Dallas' history remains something most people aren't aware of," Warnock said. "I have to give credit to Austin. At least you claimed your music history. We never really claimed it in Dallas. We just let it go."

Antone's Records hosts a double feature of When Dallas Rocked and You Must Be Weird or You Wouldn't Be Here at Tom's Tabooley on Sunday, May 25, 6pm. Admission is free, but seating is limited.


Players' Guide

Here in Austin, we like to think of ourselves as a little bit country and a little bit extraterrestrial. So if we host a game jam (i.e., a challenge for developers to make a game in a short period of time), a space cowboy theme is just about right. Local indie game collective Juegos

Rancheros and game culture website **Venus Patrol** have put out a call to anyone to make a game fitting that theme between May 24 and June 8. The best games will be put on display at the Marfa Film Festival in early July. More jam info will be posted at www.itch.io/jam/ space-cowboy-jam, but you can email gamejams@venuspatrol.com if you're too excited to wait. We understand.

It's one thing to make a game quickly, it's another to let everyone watch you do it. That's what local developer **Shay Pierce** has done for the last few weeks. He took a break from a larger project to spend 20 days coding and illustrating a game



he calls Angry Henry and the Escape From the Helicopter Lords Part 17: The Re-Reckoning (aka AHatEftHLXVII:tRR). The ordeal is over now, and the game has been submitted to the App Store, but you can still watch his daily streams from those 20 days at www.twitch.tv/shaymakesgames if you really want a sense of what it takes to make a game. Spoiler alert: It's hard.

Local developers Renegade Kid have had a roller coaster of a month. Their Kickstarter campaign for horror survival game **Cult County** fell far short of its goal and spawned several editorials about what went wrong, making armchair marketing experts out of most anyone with access to comment boards. Even with the team's solid reputation developing for Nintendo and a strong background in the genre, it seems the stars just weren't aligned for Renegade Kid. They bounced back quickly, however, with the release of **Moon** Chronicles for Nintendo 3DS

last week.

If giving actual dollars to a local game is not in the cards, you can support the scene another way. For those unfamiliar, Steam is the platform for PC and Mac games. It's the PC equivalent of the App Store, and to be distributed by Steam can be the difference between a handful of people seeing your game and it being accessible to the entire gaming world. Developers must be established or have their game go through a Greenlight process to be distributed. You can log on and vote for these local games looking to get Greenlit: Saam Pahlavan's Disorder, Minicore Studios' The Sun at Night, Brian Bonnet's Teknedia, and Capsule Force from Klobit are all well worth the upvote. Go online for links, or use your Googling skills to learn more.



Girls Gone Geek

Weird Girls: Winning the battle to be yourself

Call Danni Danger a weird girl, and she'll probably take it as a compliment. Although, she'll also correct you. She's one of the Weird Girls.

That's the name of the Austin-based website and YouTube channel dedicated to all thinks geeky. In any given week, there will be new entries on anything from cosplay techniques to book reviews, convention etiquette to fantasy film-casting. What makes it different from a lot of other fan sites is that the hosts are all women.

Danger is the site's resident expert on comics, and she is quick to explain this isn't a site for women in geek culture. This is a site for everyone in geek culture, but one that highlights women as experts, makers, and reviewers. She says, "I want to talk about things from a female perspective. Not just because a woman needs to say it, but because somebody needs to say it. It was really important to me to have someone go. 'OK, can we talk for a minute about the fact that they're trying to pull off this woman fighting in thong underwear and a corset?" I've worn both. Not possible."

So why weird girls? Why not weird women? Ask website creator Mark Gardner. Back in 2012, he was dining with friends before a UT volleyball game. He'd ended up at the kids' table, and realized the preteen girls were having a much more interesting conversation than the adults. That morphed into his pitch for a Web series: Weird Girls, the story of four demon-hunting gradeschoolers that he described as "The Goonies meet Poltergeist with a liberal dose of Buffy." He couldn't depend on developing a lightning-in-a-bottle Web smash like The Guild or Red vs. Blue, so he decided to build

an entire community. He says, "We can supplement the higher cost of the scripted series with lower-cost blogs, like we do right now, and it also gives our fans content between the scripted seasons."

Gardner took the term "weird" from a column by author Joe Peacock, who made it a badge of honor: "Being 'weird,' whether you're a guy or a girl, means winning the battle to be yourself." Next step was finding the front-of-camera talent. He wanted to keep that female, genre-savvy voice constantly present. It was Brandon Zuern, the store manager at Austin Books & Comics, who told him, "'You need to talk to Danni.' It was pretty clear early on that she was going to be a pretty significant part of this."

Part Pauline Kael, part Red Fraggle, Danger was one of the store's most knowledgeable and enthusiastic employees, and, in her costumed alter ego as Sidekick Girl, its official mascot. She had been thinking about something similar to Gardner's proposal for the previous five years, so she jumped at the chance. She says, "When I'm in the shop, I'm the happiest I am in the world, doing what I love. I want to make that a form of entertainment for people."

But it was still a long way from that "yes" to a show. Danger says, "When we began, we didn't know what we were going to talk about. It was, 'OK, we're going to talk about comic books. All right, we're going to talk about the color blue. Can you narrow it down a bit?" She started looking at other women doing online video coverage of sequential art, and found there weren't many. This was before Felicia Day's GeekandSundry.com became an essential bookmark, and before ComicBookGirl19

Danni Button aka Danni Danger (1) and Kelli Nova of Weird Girls

did her TED talk, back when it was really just Blair Butler for G4's Attack of the Show and Grace Randolph recording The Watcher for Marvel Comics. But it was still essential research she did want to do. "It's not worth it for me to waste anybody's time if I don't have some unique perspective on things. If I don't have an individual outlook, if I'm just talking to hear myself talk."

The first recording, a review of the horror series Locke & Key, was rough. "It was a five-minute video that took two-and-a-half hours to do," says Danger, but it immediately picked up fans. Two in particular were instrumental: Joe Hill, the comic's writer, and Gabriel Rodriguez, its illustrator, who retweeted the video. When that happened, Danger says, "This is a thing. We're going to be OK." That support from artists and writers is part of what excites her about comics. "The people who do this stuff make themselves so accessible. They are just normal, regular people who happen to be well known because they create something for a popular medium. They're even, in some cases, nervous and uncomfortable about talking to people because they just don't expect it."

So Danger had the comics covered, but there's a lot more to geek culture than just four-color storytelling. Enter gamer and cosplay expert Kelli Nova, who met Danger and Gardner at Wizard World Austin. She admits, "I cyberstalked them forever. After a month they said, 'Hey, where's that girl?"" Gardner approached her about joining the team, and gave her some simple advice: "If you make videos that you want, people are and creepy Weird Girl from Tim Burton's Frankenweenie. Happy coincidence, she and the site were using the same hashtag. She started following them, and then last year, she won a scavenger hunt they organized at San Diego Comic-Con. The prize was a stack of graphic novels and a subscription to Loot Crate, a company that sends blind boxes of toys, games, and merchandise to subscribers. Every time one arrived, she would do a short video about unboxing the mystery contents. She says, "Little did I know, Weird Girls was watching."

She's now their resident Disney expert. That's all of Disney, from cartoon classics to recent acquisitions like Marvel and Lucasfilm. But it's not all Mickey Mouse ears and Epcot memories. In a recent video. Dawn tackled the sometimes thorny issue of Disney princesses. Films like Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs and Cinderella face contemporary criticism for being anti-feminist, and Dawn understands that. "It leaves a bad taste in people's mouths because these ladies are a bit different than the girls we are raising." But she argues that it takes more than imitating Tinker Bell to turn back the social clock. "I don't think liking these characters is going to influence your young girl that she needs a man to save her or only pretty girls get the prince. How you raise your child is what counts, not what he or she is watching." Moreover, with films like Frozen and Brave highlighting young women controlling their own destinies, "Disney has caught on and the female characters in these films now are strong, independent, funny, and smart. I just think people are still having a hard time accepting the older princesses into the new group of princesses for that reason."

Case in point: Last year, DC Comics gave Wonder Woman a costume change and swapped her traditional onepiece for pants and a leather jacket. "Everyone went, 'Oh, well, the feminists should be happy she's wearing pants.' Well, no. You just put pants on her to put pants on her. going to respond." Like Danger, she was new to the short online format. "It was painful at first to find my footing," she says. In the early days, there'd be a lot of waiting around as Nova worked on a costume piece. "Now, if I'm making something, I get each stage ready and shoot it. ... With the more personality-based things, I just say, 'OK, I'm going to talk for 20 minutes, and then edit it down."

While Gardner's drama nears filming, the site grows with new content, adding contributors, and tackling fresh areas like roleplaying and desktop gaming. Danger says, "As we expand the realm of what we talk about, we get more views."

Kentucky-based Amanda Dawn is one of those new Weird Girls. She came across the site by sheer accident: A Disney fanatic, cosplayer, and video blogger, she had posted pictures to Twitter of herself as the wide-eyed

Geekery, nerd-dom, fan culture, whatever you call it, is going through some serious soul-searching about the representation of women and minorities. Internet trolls get publicly shamed when they harass other users. Warner Bros. gets pilloried on a daily basis for their failure to get a Wonder Woman movie off the ground, while Marvel fans are cracking their knuckles for a Captain Marvel marquee feature. Last month, the We Are Comics Tumblr and the accompanying #Iamcomics hashtag went viral as readers celebrated their diversity. That includes the stereotypical comic-fan demographic of white males, and it's a discussion Gardner has had as the guy among the weird girls. While he's basically there to provide some content and support (he's Commissioner Gordon to their Batmen, rather than Charlie to their Angels), he has faced accusations - mostly from men - that

he shouldn't be intruding on a female space. "Danni and Kelli went crazy on the commenters," he says. "We talked about it a little bit, and what it came down to for me is that the channel is not about women doing stuff for themselves. It's about people coming together."

The ultimate coming-together is always a convention, and if one doesn't have a zero tolerance/no harassment policy, that's grounds for not going. After all, cosplaying isn't just about wearing the costumes. It's about making them. It's about becoming proficient in leatherwork and vacuum forming, learning how to add servos or cooling fans, understanding what glues will bond to what materials and what will melt straight through. That's hard enough without also having to deal with misogyny. Nova says, "The female cosplayers in the forums, there are some of them who have to physically show themselves using Pepakura [design software] because other people say, 'Oh, yeah, your boyfriend did this." It can get even worse at conventions, where Nova often is accompanied by her husband. She says. "When he's there, everyone's fine. When he's not there, the creepers come out of the woodwork." While it's frustrating and disturbing that some fans think leering and groping is acceptable, Nova says, at the same time, "We're having our conversation, and people are being brave enough to point it out."

That fight goes back to the famous Women in Refrigerators list. In 1999, comic writer Gail Simone (Wonder Woman, Birds of Prey) struck back against Green Lantern (issue 54), in which the hero's partner was murdered and stuffed in a refrigerator. The death was just dumb, and reduced the vic-

tim to a plot device. So Simone and her friends came up with a list of every time a supporting character was metaphorically or literally stuffed in that same fridge. Unsurprisingly, it happened to female characters a lot more often than their male counterparts (as Simone wrote at the time, "Not every woman in comics has been killed, raped, depowered, crippled, turned evil, maimed, tortured, contracted a disease or had other life-derailing tragedies befall her, but ... it's hard to think up exceptions." It's beyond disappointing that Danger, Nova, et al. still have to make that same point, but, Danger says, "It's great to be able to put my foot down and say, 'Hey. Stop refrigerating characters.' 'Using rape as a plot motivation just because you can't think of anything else is tacky."

And while Danger is quick to criticize the comics community, like Dawn with Disney she's also quick to defend it from what she sees as misguided attacks. She says, "There's this great misunderstanding that objectification of female characters means them being scantily clad." Case in point: Last year, DC Comics gave Wonder Woman a costume change and swapped her traditional onepiece for pants and a leather jacket. "Everyone went, 'Oh, well, the feminists should be happy she's wearing pants.' Well, no. You just put pants on her to put pants on her. That's not the issue we have with the treatment of women in comics." Or another case in point: Barbarian warrior Red Sonja. Her costume seems like the worst fanboy fetish wear: part scale-mail, part beachwear. Yet the She-Devil With a Sword is often cited as one of the great female characters of comicdom, and is currently being written by none other than Gail Simone. Danger sees traces of grand American Puritanical prudery in some of the criticism, and as long as Sonja is written as a rounded character, her costume should not be an issue. In fact, as written by Simone, she's arguably the original weird girl. She's comfortable with herself, and to Hades with everyone else.

After that, the only real question is one of practicality. Danger says, "Why is that woman fighting in a chain-mail bikini? That's not protecting any of her internal organs. That's just silly."

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Fun Fun Fun Fest: Hell Bent for Leather

Now that Fun Fun Fun Fest has unveiled it's 2014 lineup. November can't come soon enough.

I'm already slipping on my spiked arm gauntlets in anticipation for heavy metal pioneers Judas Priest, whose leather-daddy lead singer, Rob Halford, hasn't ridden his Harley onto an Austin stage since 1988, and decorating my mug with black and white grease paint in excitement over seeing King **Diamond**, a Dallas resident who hasn't toured the U.S. since 2005. Of course, the annual genre-music gathering isn't all vintage metal acts.

Indie rock devotees rejoice in underground heroes Neutral Milk Hotel and sensitive stars Death Cab for Cutie. Hip-hop headliners span old- and newschool, with Wiz Khalifa and 2 Chainz billed under Nas. When asked if the latter's performing his canonized 1994 LP Illmatic is cooler than ACL Fest's Outkast and Eminem, FFF co-founder James Moody grinned broadly.

"Yes, by far," he nodded. "It's one of the most legendary hip-hop records ever." Additional performers at the three-day

Six local musicians are being sent to Canada next month to represent Austin at Toronto's North by Northeast festival. The "ATX6" are indie pop songstress Dana Falconberry, East Cameron Folkcore singer Jesse Moore, blues guitarist Mrs. Glass, ambient folkie Aisha Burns, Americana badass Leo Rondeau, and country songwriter Carson McHone. Devised by Austin Independent Radio's Chris Brecht and financed by local venue and media sponsors, with insitutional help provided by the city of Austin's music office, the opportunity offers the group, four of whom have never performed in the Great White North, exposure at a NXNE showcase. "We wanted this to be a golden opportunity for deserving, hard-working Austin musicians who wouldn't otherwise play NXNE," said Brecht. Another local band, Spoon, headlines the music conference, held June 13-22, but they didn't get charity tickets. No word on whether Toronto's mayoral party animal **Rob Ford**, who's shown interest in Austin music and rock in general, will attend.

His tour manager, Ben Richardson, introduced them to his Grady bandmate Gordie Johnson, who tracked the Wolves' amp-stacking session at Arlyn Studios in January 2013. Three months later, **Dead Boys** guitarist **Cheetah Chrome** and Nashville musician **Shannon Pollard** witnessed the Wolves at Escovedo's SXSW party and inked them to their Plowboy Records.

A Weekend in Austin still moshes

Naturally, a fraction of the crust punk, death metal, and DJ-oriented experimentalism going viral after Memorial Day weekend every spring can't constitute the total CiT experience, so the local booker's dubbed May 28-June 1 "A Weekend in Austin." From Russian and Chilean Satanism (Pseudogod, Diabolical Messiah) to San Franciscan songcraft (Kelley Stoltz), the pit's shrunk for sure, but it's no less of a domeripping rush. - Raoul Hernandez

For an inaugural desecration of American soil, Russia's Pseudogod woke the demons from its debut long-player, 2012's Deathwomb Catechesis, a hellish wrath of graveyard growls, firing squad blastbeats, and riffing both brutal and atmospheric. Before boarding a long flight to the U.S., guitarist D. Nekros fielded questions via email about the satanic forces and Stateside bands that inspire Pseudogod.

Austin Chronicle: From the cover art to the lyrics on Deathwomb Catechesis, we experience the apocalypse.

D. Nekros: The front illustration represents the triumph of the mighty dragon over Saint George. See it as allegory of the domination of chaos over order, a triumph of darkness over light. Each track reflects it in different aspects and manifestations. I'm not here to explain the lyrics, just try to discover it by

yourself, and, if your vision is like ours, you will find the key to understand the meaning of the album.

AC: How much is Pseudogod's music informed by spirituality compared to social and

political ideas? **DN:** I would say that spiritual

beliefs are the main driving force of the band. The band is the reflection of our faith. Our music is about higher concepts than politics or social problems, but inspiration can be found in many different things around you depending on how you see it.

AC: What American acts have influenced Pseudogod?

DN: To name just a few of the most important for us, old Von for brutal, monotonous

sound, Necrovore for unparalleled atmosphere, Black Witchery for barbaric violence, and Goatlord for their dark and dirty tone.

AC: What's life like for a metal band in Russia?

DN: The underground metal scene isn't very strong and, frankly, I do not like most of the bands out here. Russia definitely isn't the best place to play this kind of

music, but it's the place where we live. The bands here face many problems, but if you're really dedicated you can solve them.

AC: Deathwomb Catechesis includes the Spanish language song "Encarnación del Mal." Is your band trilingual?

DN: Lyrics for that track were written by our friend and brother Tomas Stench from Morbosidad. It was great experience for us to work with him. This is our tribute to the old South American scene, which influenced us in many ways.

AC: For people who haven't heard of Pseudogod, what can they expect out of your live show?

DN: Be ready for pure vehement decimation!



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

Destruction Unit

This Arizona collective finds its form in sheer, visceral force. Three feedback-sodden guitars, a concussive rhythm section, and the odd overdriven synth bleat bore through unguarded defense mechanisms in a triumph of psych-noise bluster.

"The sound that immediacy creates is what we sound like," asserts guitarist JS Aurelius. "It gets people's attention because everyone wants a reason to put their soul on the line, and when someone does it publicly, you're forced to consider it yourself."

Founded in 2000 by guitarist/keyboardist/ vocalist Ryan Rousseau, DU began as a dystopian synth-punk side project that once featured the late Jay Reatard. These days, the quintet is an entirely different animal, now signed to the pace-setting Sacred Bones label. Destruction Unit demonstrated newfound comfort in the studio on last year's Deep Trip, standout track "Bumpy & Road" channeling the heat distortion of a two-lane desert highway with oversaturated, cinematic vigor.



Ultimately, stylistic assignations fall away, leaving only the commitment to move things forward. "If it can be done by us in the desert, it can be done by anyone anywhere."



Encrypted menace, lonely tremolo, and herky-jerk rhythms abound on the Detroit quartet's second album. Joe Casey's vocals recall the dour, embittered bellow of Mark

E. Smith under the influence of domestic everyman spirits. His rumpled, centerstage spectacle provides a reliable fulcrum around which the band morphs from one

A displaced surf progression driving "Maidenhead" sheds its innocence as Casey sings about feeling dead inside, and "Ain't So Simple" provides a humanizing chaser with raw, tube-amp warmth. Nothing **Guilty of** Everything (Relapse)

For an act this high on volume, Guilty of Everything betrays more interest in soothing than smashing.



The Philly fourpiece's debut wraps crystalline melodies in a palliative blanket of fuzz and shoegazing psychedelia, but make no mistake: This ain't any dream-pop/black metal mélange called metalgaze. It's the real deal – eyes to the ground, tempos at a stroll, and the volume knob broken off. "Dig" and "Endlessly" drift like seagulls over the surf, wafting gorgeously through waves of gusting sonics, while "B&E" crashes against the jetty, sending spray up to the heavens. "Bent Nail" ups the tempo and hooks for the catchiest alt-rock tune to never rule early-Nineties radio. More assuage than assault, Nothing gives warm hugs really loudly.

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
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


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BettySoo When We're Gone

Five long years since the release of 2009's Heat Sin Water Skin, BettySoo returns with an emotionally wracked and poignant collection for her fourth LP. The time between has steeled her vision, unlocking tiny transformational moments in her songs that capture the encompassing swell of depression, heartbreak. and torrents of everyday life. The local songwriter's pop sensibilities remain untarnished yet expanded, as on the disjointed rhythm and brooding cello build of opener "Listen." Although "Love Is Real" and "Summertime" burst with brightness, they conceal darker, harrowing tones in the balance of hope and sorrow.



BettySoo's vocal versatility marvels throughout, trilling in the swirl of "Last Night" and breathing low despair on "The Things She Left Town With" and "Josephine," a sound shifting between Patty Griffin and Lucinda Williams. Though excavating depths with a cool, observant distance, When We're Gone tears at pain with precision, especially on the brutal "Nothing Heals a Broken Heart." A songwriting leap forward well worth the wait.

Old 97's Most Messed Up (ATO)

Rhett Miller exhales prior to jumping into the raison d'etre for Most Messed Up, opener "Longer Than You've Been Alive." In that



breath, one can almost hear his Dallas fab four's double decade of recording. Then he leaps into the song's tumbling verses, underlined by, "We've been doing this longer than you've been alive/ Twenty good years, what about 25?" This 10th studio disc splays a far cry from both volumes of 2010/11 opus The Grand Theatre, because past its christening Dylanesque by way of Todd Snider - Miller echoing Tom Petty's hard consonants - it's all lyrically downhill across party anthems ("Wasted"), fuck songs ("Let's Get Drunk & Get It On"), drug shrugs ("The Disconnect")

"This Is the Ballad." Sixties pop licks and fills embellish upstrokes destined for upped rpms live ("Nashville"), but the best riff turns on acoustic strummer "Wheels Off."

While vocalist Corey Anderson's unintelligible, megaphone slurring pushes EQ levels into the red and blares lo-fi over the sequence of typically 90-second song bursts, Dead Space anchor Garrett Hadden revs the engine room with wrench-tight basslines on the 10-word "Living Alone" and twitchy, loose-nut anthem "Atomic Bomb." The latter stands as the 23-minute disc's best track until grand finale "Simple C" approximates Lou Reed getting wasted with Fugazi (wink). Musically, Ghetto Ghouls shirks complexities - Dan LeVine's one-note guitar lead on "It's So Cold" - but it subsists on reckless energy, and they have loads of it. - Kevin Curtin

Drummer Danny Blanchard, also of Wiretree and Sweet Spirit, keeps tempos running hot, while bassist Jon Fichter holds the line to keep his bros-in-arms on the rails. The roiling "Never Gonna Know" wallows bluesy and anthemic, the blasting "This Is War!" spikes both hair and coffee, and tuneful confections "Highway to Nowhere" and "Try Try Try" sound like the kind of radio fodder you wish was coming out of your speakers. Living in the Underground may be meat and potatoes, but there's good reason that dish always satisfies. - Michael Toland

So Long, Problems Ashes in the Rearview

"We don't draw, but worst of all, we don't try," announces So Long, Problems in opening their debut LP, a declaration



of opting out of the band hustle even as the local quintet finally seems ready for a bigger spotlight. "Draw" surges with a Mott the Hoople, Memphis-horned boogie meets early Wilco behind Mike Schoenfeld's rattled vocal edge. Recent addition Graham Weber adds a balance of songwriting with his drowsy, poetic tenor to Schoenfeld's more aggressive anxiety, as "Giving Up" and "Rose" play into Ashes in the Rearview's posture of affected ambivalence and resignation. "Outliving the Ghost" surprises as a sharply shifting jam, even as "Almost Anna Sage" falls into more standard alt.country. Weber works well with a band backing his easy melodies on "Past is Gone," especially cut against Schoenfeld's crazed "License Plate Eyes," while "Can't Win" folds the fatalistic frustration into coda "Draw 2." - Doug Freeman

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O Canada! Skylar Murphy, 18, happened to show up at Alberta's Edmonton International Airport in September 2013 with a black powder-loaded pipe bomb in his carry-on, ready to board an international flight. Agents confiscated the bomb but allowed Murphy to continue on his trip, and in fact police were not notified, nor were possible "terrorism" ties examined, until four days later. (Canada's version of the Transportation Security Administration is not allowed to apprehend or detain passengers.) In December, the harsh hammer of justice finally slammed down on Murphy. He was fined \$100 and sentenced to a year of probation.

TOO MUCH MONEY

Larry Ellison, the CEO of Oracle Corp. (and the world's fifth-richest person, according to Forbes magazine) is a big basketball fan and was reported in April to have an interest in purchasing the Los Angeles Clippers NBA team. An Ellison associate told The Wall Street Journal that, for example, Ellison has basketball courts on at least two of his yachts and shoots hoops for relaxation on the open water. To retrieve his errant shots that go overboard, Ellison hires a ballboy in a powerboat to trail the yachts.

LATEST RELIGIOUS MESSAGES

Speaking on a popular Christian Internet podcast in March (reported by Houston's KHOU-TV), Pastor John Benefiel of Oklahoma City's Church on the Rock described how, in a 2007 blessing, he might have prayed "too hard." He was attempting to help drought-stricken Texas and Oklahoma by using a specific prayer message (the "Baal divorce decree"), but that inadvertently resulted, he said, in "every lake" in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, and Missouri rising above flood stage, causing thousands of people to lose their homes and 22 to lose their lives.

In his March 23 sermon (according to Huffington Post), Phoenix, Ariz., pastor Steven Anderson of the Faithful World Baptist Church explained in detail why women in the congregation must refrain from speaking during services. Citing 1 Timothy 2:11 and 1 Corinthians 14, Anderson said women should learn only "in silence." "Now obviously, before the service begins," he conceded, "there's chatting and talking going on that's perfectly legitimate. [And when] we all sing praises to God,

of course the ladies should also lift up their voices. But when it's learning time, it's silence time [for females]." (Also, he said, since the comment "Amen" means "That's true," it would be inappropriate for females to utter it.)

At one Hindu temple in India's Kerala state, the religious gift of choice – both for offerings to the deity Lord Muruga and for distribution from the deity to devotees – is the chocolate candy bar, which visitors bring in by the carton, according to a March report by the *Press Trust of India*. (Muruga is the son of the lord Shiva and was originally worshiped as a child, leading to speculation that he would respond to chocolates.)

Details! After convicted murderer Loren Larson Jr. filed a federal lawsuit in Anchorage, Alaska, claiming that his prison wristband ID "defil[ed]" him religiously because it was a "mark of the devil," a Goose Creek Correctional Center official lectured him on the Book of Revelation. Actually, wrote the official, we would be commanding the "mark of the beast" only if we ordered the ID either "in the right hand" or "in the forehead," and neither is required by current wristband policy. (Hence, the double-murderer, serving 198 years, still qualifies to avoid hell.)

An unnamed British inmate published a letter in a prison newspaper in April alleging continuous religious discrimination against him by guards and officials. The man claims he is a practicing Jedi (and of course cannot reveal his name because he fears retaliation "from the dark side") and complains that Jedi-ism, though officially recognized as a religion in the UK (the seventh-most popular, according to the census, with more than 175,000 adherents) is nonetheless unacknowledged by the National Offender Management Service.

INHUMANE SOCIETY

Denmark's Copenhagen Zoo aroused worldwide ire in February when it slaughtered and publicly dismembered a healthy young giraffe ("Marius") in order to feed a hungry lion. Then, in March, the zoo killed four healthy lions to make room for a new male. By contrast, reported Vice in April, Denmark has no law against humans having sex with animals (unless it amounts to torture). Animal rights campaigners have recently expressed alarm that Denmark will become a destination for "animal sex tourism," attracting horny "zoophiles" from around the world.

OUESTIONABLE JUDGMENTS

Manhattan's New York Sushi Ko is only the most recent sophisticated restaurant to feature creative dishes made with Hormel Spam, and foodies and hipsters in fashionable neighborhoods have flocked to the foods. Spam is a well-known delicacy in Hawaii, and the New York facilities offer the island's *musubi* (fried Spam, rice, seaweed) and other Spam fried-rice bowls with seared ahi and flourishes of fresh pineapple, according to an April report on Gothamist. 
LEAST COMPETENT FIRST-RESPONDERS:







Chef is filled to the brim with the kind of heart and vivacity that makes up for the film's familiar storyline, in which a man returns to basics

in order to rediscover his passion, reclaim his soul, and reconnect with his 10-year-old son. Nothing is terribly surprising in Chef's plot, but its up-to-date narrative ingredients of a food truck, Twitter, and the Internet add a freshness to the overall product that blends nicely with its heart and soul. It's been more than a decade since Jon Favreau. who stars in the film as well as writing and directing it, has imbued a film with this kind of warmth. That was back in the days of Elf and Made, rather than Favreau's more recent effects-driven fare like Iron Man,

Zathura: A Space Adventure, and Cowboys & Aliens.

Ten years before the start of Chef, Carl Casper (Favreau) was hailed by the influential food critic Ramsey Michel (Platt) as one of the best new chefs in the U.S. That was when Carl was based

in Miami, where, presumably, he also met his wife Inez (Vergara). Although she is now his ex-wife, Inez still feels warmly toward Carl, and they share custody of their son Percy (Anthony). All of them live in the Los Angeles area now, where Carl is the chef at a swanky restaurant owned by Riva (Hoffman), a testy man who forbids Carl from preparing anything other than the establishment's tried-and-true dishes. Hoffman and Favreau, in character, lash out at each other with delightful fits of pique, after which Carl packs up his knives and walks out. Cooling his heels on a trip to Miami with Inez and Percy, Carl comes into possession of a beaten-up food truck, and his new life begins.

Joined by his kitchen underling Martin (Leguizamo) from New York and his son. Carl travels back to L.A. in the food truck, making memorable stops along the way to sell their Cuban sandwiches in New Orleans and Austin. (Aaron Franklin even gets a cameo when the truck stops at his

Austin barbecue joint, and Gary Clark Jr., Güero's, and some other local icons can be seen onscreen.) Percy promotes their food via Twitter and a Facebook page, which leads to familiar intergenerational barbs about new media. Meanwhile salsa music, R&B,

Hill Country Galleria, Violet Crown, Westgate and New Orleans funk play over the film's

> numerous yet lively food-prep sequences. It's obvious that many parallels can be drawn between Chef's fictional story and Jon Favreau's filmmaking career. That need to get back to basics and allow one's creative work to live or die on its own merits is intrinsic to both story arcs. Favreau serves up a tasty dish with Chef. So what if all the ingredients are familiar, when the result tastes fresh and handmade.

Any drama about a well-to-do young woman in the late 18th century almost certainly has to be about the problem of securing a suitable husband - how many other plots are available to female characters? - but Belle adds an intriguing dimension to the marriage plot, enriching the usual complications of class, finance, and romance with the issue of

Inspired by a 1779 painting of two real-life cousins - one black, one white - Belle presents a fictionalized account of the comingof-age and courtship of Dido Elizabeth Belle (Mbatha-Raw), the illegitimate, mixed-race daughter of a British naval officer and a former slave. At a young age, Belle is brought to England to be raised by her uncle, Lord Mansfield (Wilkinson), who treats her with love but also strict attention to "the rules" that is, a balance between the privileges of Belle's birthright and the perceived burden of her skin color in a country plumped up by slave-trade profits. Another wrinkle: All of England is awaiting the ruling of Mansfield -Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench - on the Zong appeal, an insurance claim case filed by a slave ship; his verdict will almost certainly have larger implications for the future of slavery in England.

The material is interesting, and the production values are top-notch. Anushia Nieradzik deserves special notice for her costume design; her luxurious dresses in deep shades of purple and magenta race the pulse more than anything particular in the plot or characterization. It's all quite well done, if only a touch too decorous.

BLENDED

Increasingly, it seems that Adam Sandler's filmmaking career functions as a means of financing his family vacations. The Grown Ups series (two films, so far) gathers together Sandler's comedy buddies for amusing but aimless rendezvous amid nature. In 2011's Just Go With It, in which Sandler co-starred with Jennifer Aniston, the action takes the characters to Hawaii for the bulk of the film, and now for Blended - Sandler's third co-starring feature with Drew Barrymore – the plot takes the characters to South Africa, where more than half the movie is set. The rest is filmed around the environs of Buford, Ga., and the town's Lake Lanier Islands Resort. By now, we've come to expect cameo appearances by Sandler's wife and children in his movies, yet no fewer than five additional Sandlers receive billing in Blended. Mind you, I'm not arguing for a complete separation of work and play, but in Sandler's case it seems like the back-end is taking precedence over inspiration and self-expression. Make another movie with Barrymore after The Wedding Singer and 50 First Dates turned out to be

box-office gold? That's a no-brainer. Pick out a vacation spot and then build a movie around it? That's lazy filmmaking.

The laziness is what irks me most about Blended. Everything from the re-teaming of the two stars and their Wedding Singer director, Frank Coraci (Sandler's go-to director when his other go-to director Dennis Dugan isn't free), reeks of moviemaking by checklist. And when there are many millions of dollars on the line, I don't necessarily want to argue that this is a wrong-headed approach. It's just unlikely that the checklist method will yield anything original - but, hey, that's not always the goal. Certainly not in the aptly named Blended.

Jim (Sandler) and Lauren (Barrymore) have a disastrous first date, but soon they find themselves booked into adjoining suites in Sun City, South Africa, when each grabs the unused vacation bookings of friends, whose own plans were scuttled at the last minute. Each arrives with their kids, who conveniently are the opposite sex of the parent. Lauren's boys need someone who can teach them how to bat balls, and Jim's girls need someone who can educate them about buying tampons. As they move from episode to episode in Africa, the reluctant duo are serenaded, pop-up fashion, by Terry Crews and a backup vocal group - reminiscent of the way the Farrelly brothers used Jonathan Richman as a commentating troubadour in There's Something About Mary and Kingpin (the primary difference being that Crews also removes his shirt and make his pecs dance, much to viewers' delight). Actually, there's a lot of funny material in Blended, and Sandler and Barrymore are, indeed, a winning duo. Yet so much of the filmmaking is sloppy (mismatched cuts, narrative implausibilities, etc.) that it's clear this film's only ambition is profit. Back in the day, artists came together in song to state that they "ain't gonna play Sun City." Their beef with apartheid is now a rallying cry from the past, but I wouldn't mind hearing another chorus or two in reaction to Blended.

X-MEN: DAYS OF FUTURE PAST

D: Bryan Singer; with Hugh Jackman, James McAvoy, Michael Fassbender, Jennifer Lawrence, Nicholas Hoult, Peter Dinklage, Ian McKellen, Patrick Stewart, Ellen Page, Halle Berry. (PG-13, 130 min.)

Director Bryan Singer, reclaiming the film franchise he launched in 2000, means to establish from the first reel that Days of Future Past is not messing around. Via



voiceover, Professor X (Stewart) explains the catastrophic present, in which killing machines called Sentinels have wiped out most of the world's mutant population and many of their human defenders, too. The accompanying visuals are ... unsettling. Holocaust associations both explicit and implicit have run throughout the X-Men films, and I'll be first in line to argue that popculture films are as worthy a place as any to say something meaningful about a historic atrocity. But if you're going to employ 3-D technology to more viscerally convey a dead body rolling down a mountain of corpses and toward an audience snacking on Milk Duds, you better be sure the movie you're making can walk the talk.

So how does Days of Future Past fare? It has its moments, though nothing here approaches the emotional sock in the jaw of Jean Grey's self-sacrifice, or that bullet to Charles Xavier's spine, or, more to the point, the way mutants' few options - live a closeted life or risk being hunted down for being different - resonated with gay viewers, an analogy the first X-Men movies made movingly. (And progressively: Anti-bullying messages and the push for gay marriage were barely part of the cultural conversation back then, let alone national rallying cries.) Which is all to say: Comic-book movies have the capability of being a lot more than just two air-conditioned hours of snazzy special effects.

Days of Future Past has superior special effects. There's a doozy of a sequence set in the Pentagon that inspired applause at an advance screening, and rightly so: It compounds digital technology, character motivation, and wit for clever alchemy. But moments of magic are few and far between. With its past and future dual timelines Days of Future Past is cannily constructed to pull in actors from both the original trilogy and the originstory reboot, 2011's First Class, and top to bottom it's a terrific cast, including new additions Peter Dinklage and Evan Peters. But the material doesn't push anyone to greatness.

The script (by Simon Kinberg) positions the series' constant, Wolverine (Hugh Jackman), as a potential savior of a future terrorized by Sentinels. He's sent back to the past to dissuade the blue-skinned shapeshifter Mystique, née Raven (Lawrence), from an assassination that will set off a ruinous ripple effect. Send the stone skimming in another direction, the theory goes, and war may be averted. Awaking in the early Seventies, Wolverine swiftly rallies a gang: young Charles Xavier (McAvoy), driven to drink after Raven, his surrogate sister, abandoned him in First Class; the nerdy Beast (Hoult), who still nurses a crush on her; and Magneto (Fassbender), the revolutionist godhead to her disciple.

Mystique is the linchpin and plot engine, but the film is vaguely disinterested in her; she's visible, but not exactly present, if you get my drift. And is it worth noting here that the early-Eighties "Days of Future Past" comic storyline had Kitty Pryde as its bridge between past and future, not Wolverine? I hesitate to cry disenfranchisement of the female players - Lawrence, ever feisty, more than holds her own with a script that could have served her better. So we'll leave it at this: Days of Future Past capitalizes on the audience's familiarity with the many players and their complex backstories, but never advances the ball down the field, tenders no new thought or wrinkle to the franchise. It's the difference between a diverting entertainment, and a riveting one.

THE AMAZING SPIDER-MAN 2

Like director Marc Webb and actor Andrew Garfield's original 2012 offering, this new film is a good example of how sometimes more can really be less. The Amazing Spider-Man 2 hits all the marks it's supposed to; what's lacking is inspiration, surprise, and real wit. Peter Parker (Garfield), aka Spider-Man, still struggles with the conflict that arises between his responsibilities as a crime-fighter and being a good boyfriend to sweetheart Gwen Stacy (Stone) - especially after the appearance of Peter's old pal Harry Osborn (DeHaan), aka Green Goblin, and put-upon electrical engineer Max Dillon (Foxx), who soon transforms into the rage-fueled Electro. It's difficult to pinpoint exactly what's wrong with The Amazing Spider-Man 2. Lengthy sequences of vertiginous superhero smackdowns abound, but there are no plot turns or character developments to keep us glued to our seats. Although handsomely mounted, this latest star in the Marvel Universe is not a leading light. (05/02/2014)



A kinetic David Belle propelling himself through openings and vaulting over obstacles to escape capture in the decayed urban terrain of Brick Mansions is the art of parkour at its most feline. It's utterly mesmerizing to watch. Unfortunately, Belle's amazing athletic agility cannot alone sustain this undercooked remake of Luc Besson's 2004 French actioner District B13. The premise basically remains the same: Here, an undercover Detroit cop (Walker, in one of his last roles) and a street-smart convict (Belle) enter the no-man's-land of the dystopian Brick Mansions - a walled-in neighborhood ruled by ruthless criminals - to detonate a neutron bomb stolen by a drug lord against whom both men harbor personal vendettas. Brick Mansions is a throwback to a more liberal era when the "man" was the enemy of the people, and, to the filmmakers' credit, it's enough to make a Fox News commentator foam at the mouth. Joe Simon and Jack Kirby's 97-pound weakling-turned-supersoldier with the redwhite-and-blue heart returns - alongside Marvel stalwarts Black Widow (Johansson), Jackson's Nick Fury, and newcomer Falcon (Mackie) - to thwart not only the free world's longtime nemesis Hydra, but also the internal strife amongst good guys at S.H.I.E.L.D. There is, to be sure, a heckuva lot of plot going on here, in addition to a boundless supply of deep-core references and spot gags. And while it doesn't deliver quite as much giddy fun as 2011's origin story (fewer Nazis to smash), The Winter Soldier is a top-flight entry in Marvel's increasingly complex multimedia omniverse. Shailene Woodley plays an averageseeming girl, Beatrice Prior, living in a futuristic, postwar Chicago - now a walled-off republic split into five temperamentally determined factions: Dauntless protects the republic, Abnegation feeds the poor, Erudite advances technology, Amity does the farming, and Candor supplies the judicators. At age 16, teenagers take a test to determine their faction aptitude; when Beatrice is tapped for three different factions - hence the title's "divergent" - her decision to join Dauntless necessitates a painful break from her Abnegationrank parents (Judd and Goldwyn). It doesn't take long for the viewer to deflate: This is not a first-rate production. And that's okay. In the absence of high art, middle-of-the-road enjoyments - the occasional comicrelief aside, a hard-working cast, and some interesting hand-to-hand combat – will suffice. FADING GIGOLO

Soon, Murray hits upon a new money-making scheme: pimping out his young friend Fioravante. Meanwhile, a bout of head lice on the homefront sends Murray off with his gaggle of children to Williamsburg, Brooklyn, to visit cloistered Hasidic widow and expert delouser Avigal (Paradis), whom Murray decides is in need of Fioravante's services. The setup is great, but Fading Gigolo's follow-through lacks dynamism. It's a shame, because there are bits and pieces of a dandy film here that get choked out by a barrier of unproductive mulch. This new documentary aims for something very difficult: It takes a tired subject – the obesity epidemic - and completely reframes the conversation. Instead, it takes the novel approach of showing us how and why most everything we thought we knew about the subject is

wrong. The problem, Fed Up argues, is that the food we consume - no matter the portion - is making us sick. The film cogently builds its case while showing us how everything we've learned about food and exercise over the past 30 years needs to be tossed out. With Fed Up, executive producers Katie Couric (who also parrates) and Laurie David aim to enrage us, and thereby goad the food industry to satisfy the appetites of newly informed consumers. THE GERMAN DOCTOR

That solicitous doctor (Brendemühl) staying at your newly opened hotel may be the infamous Josef Mengele, the Angel of Death behind the Third Reich's horrific genetic experimentation. The good doctor considers Lilith a "perfect specimen" for his growth-hormone injections, and while her mother Eva (Oreiro) welcomes his ministrations, her father Enzo (Peretti) remains suspicious. Despite giving away the story's big reveal at the very beginning, writer/director Lucía Puenzo (XXY) imbues the film with a potent sense of dread. Now, any professor who begins his class this way would likely find himself booted from that institution. But this exaggeration corresponds with the film's overall tone: You're either a true believer or a jerk. With its starkly obvious narrative conflicts and character depictions, God's Not Dead seems to maintain the patently evangelical belief that everyone of differing opinion is also out to proselytize for their beliefs. The film's human drama only bogs things down, with expository dialogue between scientists (Watanabe and Hawkins); a former nuclear plant manager (Cranston), presumed to be crazed with grief over a 1999 meltdown in Japan, who talks of another impending crisis; and a focal family (Taylor-Johnson, Olsen, and Bolde) who struggle to reunite amid the mayhem. Director Gareth Edwards (Monsters) marshals all the creature effects admirably, but the human interactions are uninvolving. This Godzilla befits our cinematic era of 3-D. digital special effects. Pinwheeling through four time frames, though set largely in 1932 at the titular hotel – alpine-high in a (made-up) Eastern European country called Zubrowka - Grand Budapest Hotel describes the first days of teenaged lobby-boy-in-training Zero Moustafa's (Revolori) tutelage under the imperturbable concierge M. Gustave (Fiennes). When moneyed octogenarian and hotel regular Madame D. (Swinton) suddenly turns up dead, the police suspect Gustave of foul play, a chase ensues, and Anderson's capering whodunit hardly stops for breath again. The Grand Budapest Hotel is a marvelous spectacle: spry, sly, and rich with microdetailed production design, tickling tributes to cinematic forebearers, and an effortless intermarriage of antic and tragic. This zippy new picture from DreamWorks Animation elevates the Cartoon Scatology Imperative and thumbs a nose at the lowest-common-denominator culture to - egads! - celebrate a brainiac. Directed by Rob Minkoff (The Lion King), Mr. Peabody & Sherman charts Peabody's beginnings as an unadoptable stray, and his meteoric rise as "valedogtorian" at Harvard. Eventually, the stray adopts one of his own, young Sherman, and together they romp through time and space in the Wayback Machine. After so many paint-by-number narratives in animation, Mr. Peabody & Sherman's nonlinear discombobulation is nothing short of delightful. Historians may blanch at the liberties taken here, but the spirit of the thing - the way it champions intellectual curiosity - warmed this nerd's heart tremendously. (03/07/2014)

MUPPETS MOST WANTED

When the dastardly Russian supercriminal Constantine, a dead ringer for Kermit, switches identities with the hapless frog - who's sent to the Gulag prison from which his evil doppelgänger escaped the faux Kermit accompanies the Muppets on their sold-out European tour with a nefarious objective. While the script is predictably passable, the popculture references are inspired. NEED FOR SPEED

Tobey Marshall (Breaking Bad's Aaron Paul, spinning his wheels here as mere window dressing) is a loner, a blue-collar mechanic and amateur racer wrongly incarcerated for a close buddy's death during a winner-take-all street race. Upon release from prison, Marshall decides to avenge those injustices by entering an invitation-only contest against his snarky nemesis (Cooper), a former business partner who framed him for the murderous act. The cross-country trip that precedes the big race is the film's centerpiece, but it's implausible at every turn. You could drive a Lamborghini through the script's gaping illogic. Somewhat fast but seldom furious. Need for Speed has no aspirations greater than triple-digit acceleration. (03/14/2014)

When a rowdy fraternity (led by Zac Efron and Dave Franco) moves in next door, the married couple is confronted with their own irrefutable grownupness. Soon enough, a late-night noise complaint kicks off a war between the neighbors. Lavishly detailing each fresh sabotage and skimping on pretty much everything else, director Nicholas Stoller sorely miscalculates his film's strengths (Rogen and Byrne) and its weaknesses (frat boys). Amusing enough, but weirdly joyless, Neighbors brings little new to the table. Gross-out comedy has become an everelevating game of one-upmanship, wherein one film's turd joke becomes another's tidal swell of diarrhea. Is there a ceiling to this sort of entertainment? ONLY LOVERS LEFT ALIVE

The film is hypnotic, which lends it an addictive sensibility. Only Lovers Left Alive has no need to resort to hyperbole when a character exclaims: "Oh darling, that was centuries ago." Carly Whitten (Diaz) is a nononsense, Manhattan career woman who rudely discovers that her boyfriend Mark King (Coster-Waldau) is married when she pays him a surprise visit and is met at the front door by his ditzy wife Kate (Mann). Histrionics and some physical comedy ensue, and are further deployed on a subsequent visit to Carly's apartment during which the two women become inebriated and bond. They follow Mark out to the Hamptons, where they see that the cur is cheating on both of them with a third woman, Amber (Upton), who eventually joins them in wreaking vengeance. Granted, femme-centered film comedies are a thing to cherish, but The Other Woman only gets it half right. (04/25/2014)

THE OUIET ONES

Purportedly "inspired by true events" – seldom a good sign – the movie recounts an Oxford professor's unorthodox psychological experimentation (circa 1974) on an extremely damaged young woman named Jane Harper (Cooke), who Professor Coupland (Harris) believes to have the ability to manifest negative emotional energy in the guise of paranormal events, such as telekinetically slamming doors and summoning other frightening phenomena. There's no sense of trepidation in The Quiet Ones, because suspense requires a cogent storyline to either create or defy the viewer's expectations. He's also violently tormented by his time as a prisoner of war, forced to work on the construction of the Burma Railway (aka the Death Railway). Based on the real-life Lomax's memoir of the same name. The Railway Man runs on two tracks: the suspenseful dramatization of Eric's PTSD and burgeoning romance with Patti in 1980, and flashbacks to his brutalizing experiences in the war. The Railway Man is a different beast, of a different era - more committed to verisimilitude, less invested in seducing the viewer with its epic scope - but the tidy coda leaves the film feeling incomplete. Transcendence is not unambitious: It raises interesting questions about morality and technology, and about how easily, imperceptibly a line in the sand may shift. 



Reggae royal Stephen Marley caught the hiphop bug in 1999 when he produced Chant Down Babylon, a remix of his father Bob's songs with verses from rappers and singers Guru, Rakim, Erykah Badu, and Lauryn Hill. Solo debut Mind Control followed eight years later, featuring Mos Def and Mr. Cheeks. 2011's Revelation Pt. 1: The Root of Life added Wale and Melanie Fiona to his arsenal.

"Street music," he says of the marriage between genres. "Both are styles of street music."

The collaboration continues on this summer's Revelation Pt. 2: The Fruit of Life, for which Marley's brought in Rick Ross, Dead Prez, Busta Rhymes, the Roots' Black Thought, and a handful of other rappers. He says each MC involved was jazzed to experiment with reggae, acknowledging the benefits of his storied surname.

"One thing that helped is the respect that the music community has for my father," says Marley. "Not just for reggae music, but because he was a voice of the people. That respect transcends to all his kids and the way that [others] see us. It's a continuation of that legacy."

Twenty years after the death of his father, Marley now finds himself on the road with his own son, Jo Mersa, a 23-year-old readying the June 10 release of his debut EP, Comfortable.

"It's a beautiful thing to be able to be here for him physically," says Marley, 42, who produced Comfortable. "I lost my father's physical presence at a young age, so I'm grateful to be here helping the third generation. My son calls me and says, 'Dad, this and that.' I never had that privilege." - Chase Hoffberger

"We breathed our last in Minneapolis right before Christmas Eve 2012. It doesn't seem like there's getting it back this time," says Johnette Napolitano, the voice and crushing bassline of the alt.rock threesome. "But it's okay. The good thing is that the last year of touring we did were the best shows we'd ever done in our entire career."

The L.A. native records her solo material, which has evolved into the three-part Sketchbook series and an accompanying book, at her home in Joshua Tree. Today, as a DIY solo act, the 56-year-old rocker ventures out for shows only one week a month.

"When we were at our peak, we were on the

road all the time. I'm talking seven months straight. That's a really hard way to live," Napolitano laments. "When you're young you're all about that. Going all over the world where you've never been. I don't want to be one of those people who's just like, 'I can't have a drink on the road, I've got to go to bed early."

"I do have that concern, but when I'm on the road I want to party and have fun. And I'm not 25, so I can only go a week out of the month.

"I had a manager tell me once, 'When you put out a record you've got to pretend it's the first one you've ever done.' That you've gotta forget about your past work, and it's absolutely true. You can't go back." Nina Hernandez
