



VOTER ID _

The Texas Voter ID law was briefly overturned, but has been reinstated for the time being by the 5th Circuit – a decision upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court. So ...

To vote in the upcoming election, you must have either:

- a Texas driver's license or ID card
- a passport
- a U.S. Military photo ID
- a U.S. Citizenship or Naturalization Certificate with photo, or
- a concealed handgun license

This ID must be current, or have expired after Sept. 6.

Texas residents who have none of those can get a free Election Identification Certificate (EIC) at any Texas Driver License office. Applicants must bring a valid voter registration card, plus proof of U.S. citizenship and identity. (For most people, that means a certified birth certificate, and one other form of official ID, such as a social security card, military ID, expired driver's license, school records, car registration - there's a long list at www.dps.texas.gov/driverlicense/eicdocreqmnts.htm if you're uncertain.) The EIC is free, and is valid for six years, or forever for those over 70, or maybe just until Texas' voter ID law is overturned for good. You'll get a photo receipt at the office that's valid immediately; the card itself will be mailed to you.

HACKING THE VOTE

Dear Editor,

Michael King opines that the Chronicle is frankly an advocacy publication, generally "leftliberal" or "progressive" in perspective ["Point Austin: Look If You Like ...," News, Oct. 17]. I had to choke that statement down after reading the gushing election endorsement for the 28-year county clerk; simultaneously insulting the alternative Green and Libertarian partys' candidates as "token."

The integrity of our elections is a nonpartisan issue: Every citizen must be able to verify their vote was counted as cast; must have the right to view their vote counted at the polling station on election night. I propose a voter-marked, hand-counted paper ballot system: a time tested, verifiable, and transparent method completely open and observable by the public.

County Clerk Dana DeBeauvoir, after touting for years the security of the current electronic voting system, is now proposing a hybrid system of electronic and paper, utilizing open source software - it won't be ready until after the 2016 presidential elections.

Unfortunately, it makes no difference if the software is open source because votes would be counted out of public view; the average voter would have to rely on computer experts to assess the security of the system. We can save millions by scrapping the secret vote counting electronics for the integrity of a hand-counted paper ballot.

Elections are not about trust, a perception that everything is fine: Our government was established with checks and balances; elections must rely implicitly on distrust. Electronic voting systems have the documented capability of hacking thousands of votes, invisibly and nondetected. A paper ballot fraud scheme would be revealed easily at the precinct vote count. All citizens must know that each politician we vote for is, in fact, duly elected. The issues of our times are too important to rely on convenience instead of confidence.







[Editor's Note: It's confusing, but there are in fact two transportation Prop. 1s on the ballot neither of them actually identified as "Prop. 1." The first is a "Proposed (state) Constitutional Amendment" that would allow use of the Rainy Day Fund for highway projects. The city of Austin's "Prop. 1" (identified on the ballot only as "Proposition, City of Austin") is the city's rail and road bond proposition. Both supporters and opponents have been informally referring to these as "State Prop. 1" and "Local Prop. 1" - they are separate, distinct items on the ballot. Additionally confusing: There are three Austin Community College propositions - Prop. 1, Prop. 2, and a third tax rate proposal called only "Proposition." What a tepid, somewhat ridiculous endorsement of the City of Austin's Proposition (aka 'Local Prop. 1") in last week's Chronicle ["Proposition 1," News, Oct. 17]. The editorial board admits "some of us argue that the former [the route chosen] is wrong and the latter [the city's planning process] has been bungled." Both (the wrongness of the chosen route and the bungled planning process) are indisputably true - yet an endorsement is the result. Rail advocates like myself, and many, many others are not waiting "for a perfect consensus" - we are working for just a better one that takes citizen voices and preferences into account. And we know the next rail plan "will inevitably

be better and more politically viable" - because we are already advancing that plan (a route on Guadalupe-North Lamar). Thankfully, elections are decided by individual voters - and not the "many local progressive organizations" that are the "broad-based support" mentioned in the endorsement (which are, to a great extent, made up of the same individuals who run from one endorsement meeting to the next). The individual voters are well aware that "the wrong route" selected by a "bungled" process is before them, and will vote accordingly. Too bad the Chronicle got this one so wrong, after pointing out its fatal flaws.







CITY COUNCIL NEXT meets Nov. 6 - an ominous two days after an election that will shuffle the members - with a return to CodeNEXT, the longawaited "coyote management plan," and a remodeled City Hall. See "Council," p.38.

MAYOR LEE LEFFINGWELL endorsed Steve

Adler as his successor Monday, saying Adler has the "gravitas, demeanor, experience, and leadership ability" to make a great mayor – and leaving his Council colleagues Sheryl Cole and Mike Martinez to fend for themselves. Expect friction in chambers and on the dais.

EARLY VOTING MAY struggle to break 20% in Travis County. At close of business on Oct. 28, just 13.9% (or 90,712) of in-person, mobile, limited and mail-in voters had cast their ballots. Step up your game, Austin. Early voting ends this Friday, Oct. 31.

COREY MITCHELL. CO-FOUNDER of the Housecore Horror Film Festival, died on Monday after the second annual festival. A mainstay of Austin's metal scene since the Eighties, and a true-crime author, his sudden death at the age of 47 left the local film and music communities stunned (see "Playback," p.90).

APD POLICE CHIEF Art Acevedo dropped the disciplinary hammer last week, indefinitely suspending (i.e., terminating) Lt. Jason Disher. The 15-year APD veteran was banished for withholding information on an official statement that detailed interactions he had with the husband of a woman he'd been canoodling with extramaritally. Disher was charged with dishonesty and retaliating.

BIG MONEY AT the Circuit of the Americas.

The Austin race track released a report this week that, between F1, the X Games, other races across the year, and the big outdoor concerts it has hosted, it was responsible for \$900 million in economic activity over the last year, with 1.1 million visitors.

JON STEWART and company are in town this week to shoot The Daily Show at Zach Theatre, and it's the hottest political ticket in town -Monday's guests included none other than Dem gubernatorial candidate, Sen. Wendy Davis.

LAST WEEKEND, DAVIS hosted a get-outthe-vote rally in Pflugerville, where she slammed GOP opponent Attorney General Greg Abbott for defending \$5 billion in education budget cuts - the focus of her latest campaign ad - and reflected on the "humbling" experience of voting for herself.

TURNS OUT REPUBLICAN state officials knew Texas' voter ID law would disenfranchise more than 500,000 registered voters while they were pushing for the bill in 2011, but failed to share the information with other legislators, according to the Texas Tribune. Oversight or willful omission?

SEN. LETICIA VAN DE PUTTE pulled a surprising campaign finance switch on her GOP opponent for the lieutenant governor's seat, Sen. Dan Patrick outraising him, \$2.09 million to \$2.05 million.





"OUTSIDE MONEY" HITS AUSTIN, AND THE REVERBERATIONS BEGIN

Welcome to big city politics. Politicos all over Austin were rushing around last week, shocked - simply shocked - that there is gambling taking place in Casablanca.

That is, official eyebrows were raised at the entry of the South Forward PAC, an "independent expenditure" political action committee based in South Carolina, into Austin mayoral politics. South Forward was live-calling hundreds (perhaps thousands) of Austin voters to oppose candidate Steve Adler, with an opposition message ("his tax plan would only help

wealthy homeowners") suspiciously akin to that of opponent Mike Martinez (and, a little less so, to that of Sheryl Cole), although only Adler's name was mentioned in the calls.

As we reported on Newsdesk Oct. 24, according to South Forward's Federal Election Commission filings, the calls were funded by the Southwest Laborers' District Council PAC, whose local affiliate is the Laborers' International Union of

> North America, Local 753. Neither the local nor the Council (both of which have endorsed Martinez) responded to inquiries, but Jay Parmley, executive director of South Forward, acknowledged the campaign, said it was similar to those pursued across the South, and added, "While we understand that some people may disagree, we


believe Austin has better choices for mayor than Steve Adler." (South Forward has duly filed a notice letter of its FEC filings with the city clerk, and Parmley insists it has followed all applicable Texas and federal laws.)

The Adler campaign was outraged at this invasion of "old style dirty politics" into Austin, and Mayor Lee Leffingwell cited the PAC campaign as a final reason ("We don't need super PACs from South Carolina telling Austinites how to vote") for his longrumored endorsement of Adler earlier this week. Adler campaign manager Jim Wick told me that the deluge of negative calls could conceivably hurt his candidate - especially with otherwise low-information November voters. But it may also be a doubleedged sword, in that the Martinez campaign has now had to spend several days disassociating itself from the outside PAC.

FIRST ONE IN THE POOL

Indeed, that's the whole point of "independent expenditure" campaigns - enabling allies to support a candidate on their own, without subjecting themselves to direct campaign finance limits. There are several local

IE groups – business groups as well as labor unions - now spending in support of their preferred candidates, increasingly incentivized by Austin's extremely low \$350 limit on direct individual contributions. Political money finds a way to get spent, and the Austin Board of Realtors, the Austin Firefighters Association, the Real Estate Council of Austin, Home Builders Association of Greater Austin ... and so on, get jiggy with it, sometimes in large doses, at campaign time.

What's different in this case is the external "Super PAC" (IRS "527 organization") enabled in the aftermath of the Citizens United Supreme Court decision to allow essentially unlimited "independent" spending. Attorney Buck Wood, an authority in these matters (he helped rewrite Texas campaign finance law in the Seventies), says even the relatively modest South Forward campaign (\$10,000, at least) represents "the camel's nose under the tent" of Texas campaign law. "It may not look like a big deal," Wood said, "but it is a big deal, if they get away with it. ... If they get away with it, everybody will be doing it."

Wood said he believes this is the first instance of a 527 PAC getting involved in a local Texas race. "I'm not really worried about the Laborers Union," he continued. But once the wall is breached, he said, "Everybody else will be seeing it as a way to evade Texas campaign finance laws."

BUY YOURSELF A CHAIR

Several of the groups mentioned above are already spending several times more than South Forward in the Council and mayor's race, supporting their candidates with mailers, signs, doorhangers, and phone calls. The city's campaign finance postings reflect more than a dozen independent groups spending a few hundred, several thousand, or (on the local transportation bond) hundreds of thousands of dollars either on candidates or particular initiatives. (One labor observer described LiUNA as "the gang that couldn't shoot straight," for not simply spending the money locally, ideally in union shops).

Add to that those candidates lending themselves thousands of dollars - with Adler at the top of the list, having lent himself more than \$300,000 (with likely more following). Especially in westside districts, wealthy candidates are demonstrating a major flaw of low contribution limits: If you can self-finance, you can outspend dramatically any candidate relying on soliciting a long list of individual supporters to compile just an adequate campaign kitty.

Even with LiUNA's out-of-state diversion, it seems finicky to howl with outrage at \$10,000 spent by a labor union against a candidate they perceive, rightly or wrongly, as closely aligned with their bosses rather than with working people, while ABOR, RECA, and the rest shovel money into their pro-business campaigns. Until Citizens United is overturned, labor groups are going to be running to catch up with business PACs - which is yet another reason not to let the camel into the Texas tent.

Maybe It's Time for Formula Two

MIGHT BOBBY EPSTEIN AND COTA BE STARTING AN F1 REFORM MOVEMENT?

Interesting series in **The Guardian** this week from reporter Paul Weaver, in town from England to cover the Formula One U.S. Grand Prix. His lead-off piece Monday, "U.S. sounds warning to Formula One, a sport teetering on the brink of crisis," praised COTA's **Bobby Epstein** and **Jason Dial**, along with race ambassador and legendary driver Mario Andretti, for trying to bring much-needed reform to the sport's ruling body, the oligarchic Formula One Group, and its infamous chief executive and cave troll Bernie Ecclestone. Weaver writes that "F1 has had no coherent leadership in the past year while Ecclestone, who [turned] 84 on Tuesday. fought bribery allegations in London and Munich courts." He goes on to detail how many of the racing teams are losing big money and sponsors (see

item below), due to archaic marketing ideas and fanunfriendly technical rules (see other item below). Epstein and Dial are quoted as wanting to bring social media to bear, and to, as Epstein puts it, "make the sport about personalities. That's what

NASCAR does very well. Formula One can learn a lot from NASCAR, from Holly-

wood. People connect with people. They don't connect with metal."

The failure to make some of those changes, Weaver warns in a follow-up article, is "making Formula One less popular – its TV audiences are hidden behind a pay wall, track attendances are also in decline, and sponsors are turning their back on the crisishit sport in increasing numbers." Yet amid the financial chaos, he notes that the Hong Kong-based private equity company **CVC** Capital Partners has reaped an estimated

\$8 billion profit from the sport since 2006.

And where does that billion dollars a year come from? Well, the state of Texas ponied up \$29 million of it: if Ecclestone and CVC can do that well at each of their 20 venues. they'd clear close to \$600 million in public money alone.

Or conversely, if Formula One didn't have to produce a billion dollars a year in profits for Hong Kong venture capitalists, perhaps it wouldn't need \$29,000,000 of our tax money, the smaller racing teams could stay afloat, and the venues could make enough money to pay their property taxes. Now that's the kind of reform we can all get behind.

As If to Illustrate Those Issues ...

Two racing teams (Caterham and Marussia) dropped out of the U.S. Grand Prix race

on Saturday, and went into bankruptcy proceedings in England and Russia, respectively. That leaves nine teams and 18 cars in the starting grid for the races here and in Brazil, the smallest fields since 2005. It also dashes the hopes of the American Alexander Rossi. Marussia's reserve driver, of being the first American driver to appear in an F1 race since

2007. ... Meanwhile Sebastian Vettel - the charismatic Red Bull driver who won both the Austin race and the overall title last year - may skip Friday's warm-up and Saturday's qualifying, due to an arcane rules violation regarding too many "power units." (Indeed, Vettel and Red Bull have struggled all year with adjusting to new rules adopted for this

While on the Other Side of Town ...

As we go to press, the sole debate in the State Comptroller race is going on, and

Dem Mike Collier is no doubt railing against that office's failure to oversee the Major Events Trust Fund (see \$29M above) and the Texas Enterprise Fund (see Richard Whittaker's "Money for Nothing," p.42), among other things. I love Leticia Van de Putte and the race she's run against our cover boy (see "Mask," p.40), but personally, for me, Collier's been the best statewide candidate of the election cycle.

And on a Completely **Unrelated Subject ...**

Some of the best advice I ever got in high school was from an algebra class: "Don't waste time trying to prove something you know isn't true." So when I read the Austin American-Statesman's big front page headline, and chart, and banner, trumpeting a new **COTA economic impact study** showing that F1 numbers "dwarf the economic impact" of events like SXSW and ACL Fest. I was kind of waiting for the reality check. And there it was, in the very end of the story on the jump page, when reporter Gary Dinges talked to several of the businesses that actually see the most direct benefits of such events. Among the businesses, of course, the verdict was clear, and unanimous: For hotels, said Marriott sales director Jay Spurr, "There's such demand during South by Southwest ... nothing really compares." And for restaurants and bars, F1 has been "a great experience," but SXSW is "more profitable" - with the one stab at quantitative comparison putting the sales bump from SXSW as six times as large as that from F1.

(Caveat: I'm a co-director of SXSW, so maybe I'm biased - if you've spent time in town during F1 and during SXSW, judge for yourself.)

HOW MUCH FOR A TRUSTEE SEAT?

Local and outside money moving into AISD races

In an election cycle with tens of millions of dollars floating around at the statewide level, a few thousand bucks seems like a rounding error. But in Austin Independent School **District** elections, that's the difference between solvency and a vanity candidacy.

The final filings (eight-day-out) in this year's trustee elections see a strange shift in overlapping allegiances. In 2012, teachers' union Education Austin and newly formed PAC Austin Kids First were polar opposites, with AKF backing the pro-reform candidates, and Ed Austin behind the more progressive names. This time around, the groups have found a little common ground. However, with education policy an open war between advocates for traditional neighborhood schools, and those pushing to dismantle a cornerstone of American civic life, there's still plenty of space for conflict. And there are also big questions about why Teach for America's 501(c)4 candidate training spinoff, Leadership for Educational Equity – a national PAC connected to the charter movement and attacks on professional educators - has suddenly taken an interest in East Austin schools.



District 1

Ted Gordon: \$8,176 raised, \$9,846 cash on hand Stanton Strickland: \$525 raised. \$95 on hand David Thompson: \$14.577 raised. \$6.014 on hand Andy Trimino: \$500 raised, \$2 on hand

The \$3,000 UT-Austin Professor Gordon received last reporting cycle from teachers union **Education** Austin's PAC is nearly matched this time by \$2,750 from Austin Kids First. He's also pulling in healthy support from familiar names around the district, including Place 9 incumbent Tamala Barksdale, former superintendent **Pat Forgione**, and former AISD spokesperson

Locally, Thompson has pulled in a lot of support, both financial and in the form of doorknockers and phonebankers, among his colleagues and fellow congregants at Austin Stone Community Church. But what's raising evebrows is his out-of-state backers, including Teach for America Vice President Zach Perin and Marketing Director Emily Leahey, TFA has seemingly a lot on the line with Thompson: Leadership for **Educational Equity** stumped up \$1.589 (in-kind) for "candidate coaching." That's on top of \$2,463 from the group in the last reporting cycle, when there was another even more surprising name: Ex-CNN anchor turned education union buster Campbell Brown sent Thompson \$650. On the stump. Thompson is eager to talk about his teaching experience, but reticence to mention that it was with TFA and charter group **KIPP**; this cash puts that issue back in the spotlight.

Bringing up the rear Texas Department of Insurance Assistant Commissioner Strickland's campaign has fizzled out, while former Pflugerville ISD educator Trimino has burned through the \$500 he got from the Association of Texas Professional Educators - his sole contribution.



District 2

Julie Cowan: \$12,825 raised, \$12,362 on hand Karen Flanagan: \$75 raised, \$405 on hand

Flanagan's campaign never really gathered any fundraising momentum, but this report puts extra emphasis on Cowan's contributors. She received \$2,750 (cash and inkind) from AKF, but her biggest single contribution came in the form of a \$5,000 check from Ellyn Yacktman. If that name seems familiar, it's because she was one of the biggest donors to Brigid Shea's county commissioner primary race. That was not without controversy, since Yacktman's husband and son were regular contributors to hardline conservatives, as well as California's Prop. 8 campaign to ban gay marriage. (See "Campaigns Trade Barbs," Feb. 2.)

District 4

Kate Mason Murphy: \$0 raised, \$0 on hand Paul Saldaña: \$1,100 raised, \$7,491 on hand **Monica Sanchez:** \$395 raised.

\$125 on hand Boosted last cycle by a \$5,000 contribution from the Education Austin PAC, and supplemented by contributions from recognizable names such as Shea and political consultant

Saldaña has maintained a clear fundraising lead over his nearest challenger, former Austin Council of PTAs chair Sanchez. True to her word, former AISD teacher Mason Murphy is running, essentially, a zero-cash campaign.



District 7

Robert Schneider: \$2,650 raised, \$2,549 on hand Yasmin Wagner: \$9,725 raised, \$7,427 on hand

Incumbent Schneider comes in with a \$2,000 boost from Education Austin, plus \$400 from former AISD trustee and ex-mayor **Carole Keeton**. In a normal low-stakes AISD election, that might be enough, but this time around it leaves him severely lagging behind Wagner – most of whose money came in a massive payday from Austin Kids First, which dumped \$8,750 (cash and in-kind) into her campaign.

At-Large Position 9

Kendall Pace: \$45,200 raised, \$4,795 on hand **Kazique Prince**: \$4,605 raised, \$12,186 on hand

The biggest single campaign contribution in this race - and maybe in any local election - is the \$36,250 in two checks and an in-



kind contribution to businesswoman Pace from Austin Kids First. However, going in to the final few days, business and race-relations consultant Prince has a bigger war chest, most notably assisted by a \$3,000 cash injection from the Travis County Democratic Party. He also received a last-minute boost as third candidate Hillary **Procknow**, who has basically renounced her campaign. endorsed his run. - Richard Whittaker

DUKES VS. LUDLOW ... VS. ETHICS





It's not who, or how much – it's when. That's how Libertarian **Kevin Ludlow** has attacked Democratic incumbent **Dawnna Dukes** over her belated campaign finance reports in the **House District 46** race.

In Texas, campaigns must submit a finance report to the **Texas Ethics Commission** 30 days before election day. In this cycle, that report covered the period from July 1 to Sept. 25, and was due on Oct. 6. Another report is due eight days before election day (in 2014, this covered contributions donated between Sept. 26 and Oct. 25, and was due Oct. 27). Ludlow's campaign was furious that Dukes filed her 30-day report late, most specifically that voters were lacking numbers for her Sept. 4 birthday fundraiser. With Dukes raising perhaps as much as \$164,000 on the night, he argued, voters needed to know where that money was coming from.

Dukes' campaign finally submitted her 30-day report (due Oct. 6) on Oct. 22, fol-





lowed five days later (on deadline) by her eight-day numbers. So what was in that belated submission? Well, for starters, Ludlow's figure of \$164,000 in one night was woefully optimistic, as she only raised \$41,720 across the entire three-month cycle. The donors themselves were the usual mixed bag of individuals, partisan PACs, and the kind of commercial lobby groups that always pick the winning team (though Democrats may blanch at the \$1,000 she pocketed from **Koch PAC**).

By contrast, Ludlow's big donations over the last few months have come from three major sources: personal contributions from himself (\$5,200), plus major donations from the **Libertarian Booster PAC** (\$10,000) and local advertising firm **Acme Partnership** (\$11,700). The Lib Booster PAC (co-founded by venerable Austin Libertarians **Wes Benedict**, now of D.C., and **Arthur DiBianca**) has since suspended operations, and in the final days, Ludlow's campaign is basically broke, with only \$172 cash on hand – those big highway billboards cost real money.

However, even in the event of a likely walkover, the belated report is (at a minimum) awkward for the Dukes campaign. The incumbent has worked hard over the last few months at not engaging Ludlow publicly, including refusing to debate him, and the filing delay has given him a campaign handhold he'd otherwise lack. Moreover, this is the third time that Dukes (or more technicallv. her sister and treasurer Ateja Dukes) has received an ethics complaint for poor financial record-keeping. She was fined \$2,800 in 2008, and \$800 in 2010, amounts that in both instances were covered by the Dukes campaign. However, while the amount of the fine decreased, the length of the commission report went up from a cursory four pages in 2008 to an excoriating 11-pager in 2010, including a curt reminder to Dukes to file her 30-day report on time. What makes this even more uncomfortable for the incumbent is that she is a sitting member of the **House**


Appropriations Committee.

Yet the TEC might not be too pleased with Ludlow either. Last year, the body adopted new rules against using ethics complaints – which are supposed to be anonymous and sealed – in campaign press material. Which is exactly what Ludlow did.

This year, Laura Pressley is running for the District 4 City Council seat as a neighborhood activist and budget hawk. She talks a lot about "affordability"; she doesn't talk at all about her fight against fluoridation of the city's water supply, her belief

that Austin Energy's "smart meters" caused her legs to twitch, or her scorn for any attempt to keep military-style weapons off city streets. Pressley also doesn't talk about her fear of smartphones, or her "gift" for sensing "vibrations" from cordless phones and iPads.

But she has talked at great length about all of these things on right-wing talk shows. Although the candidate does not care to discuss them now - she declined to discuss any of them for this story - her orations survive on YouTube.

On Nov. 10, 2013, Pressley talked with conspiracy-monger Alex Jones, on his *Infowars* radio show, about how the **Austin** Energy Smart Meter at her house made her and her husband's legs "twitch" at night, keeping them awake. AE describes a smart meter as "an electronic hardware device that uses advanced metering infrastructure software to measure the amount of electricity used and at what time of day.

Smart meters send this information to Austin Energy by way of radio frequency waves." Because there is no need for a staff person to read the meter directly, the utility gets real-time data and saves money through use of the meters. After she com-

> plained, Pressley says, AE replaced her meter with the previously standard meter, which must be read in person - and she takes credit for persuading AE to provide this "opt-out" program.

> AE charges \$75 for reinstallation of the old meter and \$10 a month to service it. AE spokesman Robert Cullick said of 390,000 customers, 68 have opted out of the smart meters. (Other utilities charge three to five times as much for customers to

get the older meter, Cullick said.) Pressley doesn't mention her battle against smart meters on her campaign website, but Austin Smart Meters, Pressley's website devoted to the subject, remains online. It contains the following statement: "Many do not want their privacy invaded with these invasive technologies."

In February of this year, Pressley appeared on The Weekend Vigilante Show


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

with host Sheila Zilinsky (another radio scare-jock, who calls herself "Alex Jones in a skirt"). During that interview. Presslev again complained about smart meters, and said she fears radiation from cell towers and smartphones as well as ordinary cordless phones. Of smartphones, she said, "That is like having a smart meter in your pocket. ... We have so many people that are concerned about having a smart meter on the side of their home but they're carrying a smart meter in their pocket."

Not Pressley. "I have a cheapo flip phone. It puts out about 500 microwatts. ... So there are options. ... Keeping it away from your body in speaker mode. Right now I am on a landline, because I'm not going to sit here for this interview and have the phone up to my ear." Pressley also told Zilinsky that she is so sensitive to microwaves and radio waves that she can sense from a distance when a cordless phone has been plugged in. She explained that she had staved at a bed-and-breakfast and asked the owner to unplug her cordless phone. The landlady agreed, Pressley said, adding, "She thought I was a little crazy, of course." The next morning, Pressley said, she was awakened when the woman plugged the phone back in. "My body could feel that she had turned them back on. ... For some reason I have this gift. I don't know if it's a gift or a curse. But I can feel these things and I

can be near someone with an iPad and my body starts to vibrate and I'll ask them to turn it off because it's just a lot of radiation; and I've never had anybody say no."

As a member of Fluoride Free Austin, Pressley testified before Council on numerous occasions, to no avail. In 2012, Pressley ran for Council against incumbent Mike Martinez. On April 27, 2012, she told Alex Jones' Infowars radio audience that her fight against fluoridation of Austin's water supply had led her to run for Council. "I staff to continue fluoridating Austin's water, "Because fluoridation of public drinking water is good, population-based public health practice according to the Centers for Disease Control and the city's Health and Human Services Department." Council spent considerable time in 2011 studying the question and, as they were advised to do by numerous health professionals, resolved the issue in favor of fluoridation. Currently, the Fluoride Free Austin website touts Pressley's endorsement by the *Statesman*.

decided to do something about it; I listened to you," she said to Jones, who told listeners, "Get behind her, get her in office."

Pressley was still fighting fluoride last December, when she sent an email to the mayor and Council listing cities that have removed fluoride from their drinking water and lamenting the fact that Austin had not followed suit. She wrote, "The system of city government in Austin has failed our citizens from a technical, scientific, and human standpoint as it relates to fluoridation."

AWU Assistant Director Jane Burazer cites a 2011 Council resolution directing

On Feb. 28, 2013, following the mass shootings at Sandy Hook Elementary School, Council passed a resolution urging Austin's representatives in Congress to "develop a comprehensive approach to reduce gun crime." Pressley implored Council not to approve the resolution, which referred to closing backgroundcheck loopholes, limiting the size of magazines, and restricting military-style guns. Pressley insisted that the proposal would prevent citizens from carrying 9mm handguns. She declared, "The right to protect ourselves is a divine right," adding, "this is

not a liberal policy. It's an authoritarian act." She told Council the resolution calls on the Congress and the Legislature "to ban military-style guns. What in the world does that mean? It's incredibly ambiguous. ... Do you understand that the military standard handgun issued is a nine-millimeter? ... That's what I carry and that's what the majority of citizens of Texas use. This resolution calls for banning nine-millimeters. Does that make any sense? ... It's an authoritarian act to disarm nine-millimeter handguns."

After several requests to address these subjects, Pressley responded via email. "I'm not sure what fluoride has to do with affordability, rail, and gentrification," she wrote, "but the Chronicle should be asking about the top issues for District 4, such as a 20% city homestead exemption, utility fee reductions, cutting subsides to big corporations, traffic, and the wasteful rail bond that I'm against. These are the issues I intend to fight for on Council."

In short, Pressley deeply disapproves of fluoride, smart meters, and smartphones, and she's got a soft spot for handguns and Alex Jones. But this month on the campaign trail, District 4 voters are not likely to hear any of Pressley's frequently declared positions on those subjects. She doesn't want to talk about it. - Jo Clifton



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Buehler Acquitted

"PEACEFUL STREETS" FOUNDER WINS ANOTHER LEGAL BATTLE

After 22 hours of evidence, a juror's dismissal, hallway conversation in close proximity to a witness that nearly led to a mistrial, a reading from Rudyard Kipling by a defense attorney, one woman ejected for taping portions of the testimony, and one witness recalled only to be dismissed without actually answering any questions - it was fitting to see prosecutor Matthew **McCabe** summarize the week's proceedings to the jury during final arguments as being "literally a three-ring circus." Generally speaking, Class C misdemeanor trials don't require four days of proceedings. This one, featuring cop-watching activist and organizer Antonio Buehler, extended into the unimaginable by its first lunch break.

Like the trial, the incident that brought Buehler to court last Thursday, Oct. 23, played out more madly than a tent-cage tiger act. On Jan. 1, 2012, shortly after 1:30am, Buehler and a friend, Ben Muñoz, stopped into a 7-11 on North Lamar Boulevard to get gas when he noticed two women - pulled over for failing to employ headlights, leading to an investigation for DUI being arrested by two police officers (Patrick Oborski and Robert Snider) in a manner Buehler and his friend considered excessively aggressive. Buehler and Muñoz used smartphones to snap photos; Buehler, 34 at the time and blessed with a booming voice, questioned the officers about their efforts. He continued asking about each officer's actions as they carried one of the women to a squad car. After detaining the arrestee, Oborski turned his attention to Buehler; a scuffle ensued. Buehler refused Oborski's directions to put his hands behind his back, was brought down to the ground,

and eventually submitted to Oborski after Snider unholstered his Taser.

Buehler was initially charged with harassment of a public official (for allegedly spitting Oborski, a felony) and resisting arrest (a misdemeanor), but in April 2013 was no-billed on those charges and indicted instead for failure to obey

a lawful order, a Class C misdemeanor punishable with no jail time and a maximum \$500 fine. He eventually won that case on Wednesday, acquitted after a five-person jury deliberated for nearly six hours, an outcome long in the making.

Two-and-a-half years to wait before trial on a Class C misdemeanor doubles as an eternity for a defendant, especially when the interval's been occupied by the creation of a police accountability organization, the Peaceful Streets Project, that now counts its followers (on social media) in the tens of thousands. After two more arrests and another court decision (see "Buehler Lawsuit Victory," Aug. 1), one can't blame Buehler for going full-throttle in his latest legal effort. "This is not about the fine," his attorney Millie Thompson told the jurors during final arguments Thursday. "And you know it."

In that ominous context, the defense saw fit to roll out every conceivable witness, including one, Jermaine Hopkins - a suspended APD officer who claims he is being fired from the force after superiors learned of his being subpoenaed by Thompson who could only testify to a series of hypo-



theticals. Attorney Thompson called Muñoz, the two women from the DUI stop, a passerby who filmed the original incident from across Lamar Boulevard, and Buehler himself. They provided smartphone photos, 7-11 surveillance footage, referenced both officers' dashcam videos, and made use of an easel and big white poster board. McCabe, in turn, called three more witnesses: Oborski and Snider, as well as APD Academy Instructor Raul Carrillo, who could also offer only hypotheticals.

Both sides debated over the fine print that defines reasonable suspicion, probable cause, "Terry stops" (brief, on-street police detentions), and constitutional rights. The state argued throughout the four-day trial that police have an inherent right to engage in temporary detainments; that Oborski acted legally by ordering Buehler to put his hands behind his back, because he deemed the order appropriate for the given situation. The chaos that surrounded that isolated incident didn't matter, McCabe argued; it wasn't Buehler's judgment to make.

Thompson suggested instead, via a string of testimonies, that Oborski infringed on Buehler's First and Fourth Amendment rights and that Buehler had done nothing to provoke Oborski illegally. She had Buehler testify to his ignorance of the officer's order, and repeatedly twisted state witnesses around their own sworn testimonies. During cross examination, Carrillo once responded to a hypothetical drafted similarly to the Buehler episode by saying one could charge the officer with assault.

It was nearly all for naught. On Monday, after two days in the courtroom and a weekend spent waiting for final arguments, observers learned that one of the jurors had informed Judge Mitchell Solomon that

he feared retribution for any decision, and thus could under no circumstances provide a verdict. Mitchell dismissed him, and McCabe pushed for an immediate mistrial. Fear is the same as indecision, he argued. It's basically a hung jury.

Solomon recessed until Wednesday, took pleadings from both sides, and decided to proceed. The five jurors settled in and McCabe declaimed his final argument. Thompson followed, and the jury recessed for deliberation shortly before noon; at five, the judge suggested either a quick verdict or another day - 30 minutes later, they ruled for the defense.

Despite the outcome, Buehler's work has just begun. He's set to defend two additional misdemeanor charges for other arrests in the coming weeks. (The first was originally scheduled to start today, Oct. 30.) Additionally, in March, a federal trial is scheduled for a civil rights lawsuit he filed against Oborski, Snider, and the APD. Buehler noted last week that winning this week's case isn't essential for a positive outcome in the civil suit, but it should help legitimize his argument moving forward. Chase Hoffberger

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
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COUNCIL: NO PLACE LIKE HOME

Last Thursday's City Council meeting was a relatively sedate affair, with a truncated agenda, several postponements, and a brace of "first readings" - Council's way of saying "It's not quite soup yet." A few of those temporary accomplishments:

- A step toward cutting back on overnight concrete pours in the Central Business District; as Downtown has become more residential, some of those residents are complaining about being kept up all night by construction of new buildings, some of them residential
- · Authorized "negotiation" of a potential management contract for a new golf course at Walter E. Long Metropolitan Park (i.e., at Decker Lake); golf-enthusiasts and golfskeptics were out in force, and Council requested more public input.

- · Approved resolutions likely moving amplified sound regulation on parkland from Parks & Rec. to the Music Office.
- Asked the city manager to explore civic crowdfunding opportunities, and establish a pilot to benefit the Neighborhood **Partnering Program**.
- Began, but did not conclude, the public hearing on the CodeNEXT process, trying to determine just how "sweeping" the land development code revisions should be.

Next week's meeting (Nov. 6) will occur in the immediate wake of the general election with four members on the dais learning whether they've won, lost ... or are heading to December run-offs. The meeting's focus may be a little diffuse.

We're tempted to report that the biggest news on the draft agenda is the return of the "coyote conflict management strategy" a directive to city staff to adopt one - an ACME project still being kicked down the road from several meetings ago. But the headline is ... Council returns home, to a remodeled Council Hall, with three more seats to be filled come January

But the agenda burgeons again, currently at 118 Items, with likely a few more to come later this week.

- They'll take a further look at CodeNEXT, with staff having recommended a "middle way" between minor tweaking (Option 1) and wholesale rewrite (Option 3).
- More action on sound amplification regs moving toward the Music Office.
- Second and third readings if there's no more disputation - on the ordinance regarding "source of income" nondiscrimination in rentals.
- · A hunt for potential sites, jointly with Travis County, for a "sobriety center" - where drunks can sleep it off instead of clogging the Travis County Jail.

We'll drink to that. - Michael King


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

Money for Nothing

The Texas record on "enterprise funds" is even worse than meets the eve

Isn't Texas supposed to be the state of "government accountability"? A place where businesses know they compete on a level playing field? Where incentives are plentiful but well-regulated, allocated through a sensible, transparent, and enforceable system of verifiable metrics?

Maybe not so much.

In 2013, Sen. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, authored Senate Bill 1390, a moderate and reasonable request for an audit of the Texas Enterprise Fund. The TEF is a government-run business incentive program; from 2003 to 2013, it distributed \$507 million to 115 private and public/private ventures, and in return the firms claim that they have created 48,317 jobs (as of December 31, 2012). Well, that's what they say. Astoundingly, even though TEF regularly received appropriations via the state budget, according to House Appropriations Committee member Rep. Dawnna Dukes, D-Austin, "We have no clue what's going on with it. Both sides of the [party] ticket have demanded to know more, to have more sunlight, to no avail."

In September of this year, the State Auditor's Office issued its report, and called the TEF a "key economic development tool" in attracting employers to Texas. That was the good news. The bad news was that there were "control weaknesses" in the system, and "it was not always possible to determine whether award decisions were supported, or

to determine the number of jobs that recipients of awards from the Texas Enterprise Fund have created." In short, the agency was handing out cash, but did not know whether it was getting its money's worth.

It gets worse. The report found that, since 2010, the management has become better and more rigorous. However,

there are serious troubles in the basic operational framework: Paperwork for many incentive agreements was flawed, and so questionably enforceable. For example, in 107 agreements requiring the creation of full-time positions, there was no definition of "full-time." There were basic failures of due diligence, errors in cost-benefit analyses, incomplete paperwork, missing documents, and failures to provide sufficient documentation to the

lieutenant governor and the House speaker who, along with the governor, are supposed to oversee the fund. Most troublingly, between 2004 and 2005, 11 projects either never actually submitted formal applications, or were not required to create new jobs - or, in some cases, managed to do neither. Those projects, which were among the earliest recipients, accounted for \$222 million - almost half of the \$506 million handed out by the TEF in its first decade of operation - with no terms and conditions. How could that happen?

ALPHABET SOUP

The TEF was founded in 2003 under Senate Bill 1771; it was authored by Davis' Fort Worth senate predecessor, Republican Kim Brimer, and co-authored by Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston. The fund's original purpose was to keep semiconductor firm Sematech from taking Texas jobs to its facilities in Albany, N.Y. However, it was expanded to become a general commercial incentive fund, with grant recipients providing an agreed-upon number of jobs in return for state cash. Explaining his role, Ellis said, "I wanted Texas to be able to compete with other states in attracting businesses to relocate or expand here."

Run as a trusteed program out of the governor's office, it is one of a word jumble of acronym-heavy commercial subsidy funds in Texas government. That makes it hard to separate out from the ETF (Emerging Technology Fund), the METF (Major Events Trust Fund), CPRIT (Cancer Prevention & Research Institute of Texas), and TMIIIP (Texas Moving Image Industry Incentive Program).

Every single one of the programs has endured some sort of scandal. In 2009, Republican lawmakers howled over Perry's unilateral decision to shift \$120 million from the unemployment insurance fund to the ETF (see "State Budget Budges Forth," April 3, 2009). The METF has been bludgeoned by critics in principal for subsidizing the Circuit of the Americas' application fee to host Formula One, and in practice for failing to require the necessary paperwork (see "Public Notice: Putting the Trust in Event Trust Funds?" Sept. 24). The CPRIT scandal went one step further: Last December, former Chief Commercialization Officer Jerry Cobb was indicted by a Travis County grand jury after he rubber-stamped an \$11 million grant application by Dallas-based Peloton Therapeutics that did not go through the required scientific or business review. TMIIIP experienced a reversal, when the Texas Film Commission rejected a grant application from Robert Rodriguez for Machete after a deluge of angry letters from Alex Jones supporters, who claimed it would start a race war (see "Is That a Wrap for Incentives?" Jan. 28, 2011).

In sum, the TEF is only the latest fund to come under a shadow.

None of this is news to Texans for Public Justice. In 2010, the watchdog group issued a scathing report on the TEF. Looking through information pulled in under open records requests, TPJ Research Director Andrew Wheat said, "The results consistently over a few years were fairly horrendous." Over a third of the companies were failing to meet their job creation commitments - so the state would simply change the terms of the deal. "The governor's office would frequently amend the contract, and the amendments would be to the benefit of the private companies, and to the detri-

ment of the tax-paying public."

Wheat sees a simple pattern: "The bigger the job claim, the bigger the fraud." Take the mouse genome program at Texas A&M, a joint public/private venture that received \$50 million and was reported to have created "thousands of jobs. The reporter dropped by to see this job miracle, and saw seven people in lab coats." Basically, every related biotech job in the state was being attributed to the

TEF grant. Similarly, the MD Anderson Cancer Center claimed every new hire after its grant was as a result of the grant. "That's absurd on its face," said Wheat.

Even the original Sematech deal was virtually a bust, with Texas spending \$40 million to maintain - not add, just maintain – 400 jobs in Texas. Wheat said, "There are people on the left and people on the right who are skeptical of the notion of government entities handing out taxpayer money

to a select elite of private companies. But if you are going to have such a program, then there is a commonsense need to insulate it from the political process."

However, that's exactly the opposite of what happened. With CPRIT and the METF, the beneficiaries were major corporations. With the film production funds, blocking Machete's application placated the lunatic fringe of the Republican base. In the case of the TEF, corporate recipients were major donors to both Perry's campaign and the Republican Governors Association, which also happens to be a major donor to those

same campaigns. "A tidy little package there," said Wheat, who easily ascribed culpability. "This was a Governor Perry program from birth," he said. "He administered it from his office, and he used it as a centerpiece of his campaign to be governor of Texas and then president of the United States."

Even if Perry wasn't actively involved in the mismanagement of the TEF, he has undoubtedly worked to ensure that lawmakers could not improve oversight. "We have tried," Rep. Dukes said, adding that there has been "an ongoing conflict" during the last three sessions between the Legislature and the governor's mansion. "There have even been efforts by [House Appropriations Committee Chair Jim Pitts] and the Republicans to zero out the budget. The governor's office came down with threats."

MEND IT ... OR END IT?

Now, at least lawmakers have the numbers to back up their concerns. Ellis praised Davis for initiating the audit, adding that it "is extremely comprehensive and gives the public an excellent overview of where the fund's governance fell far short of what's expected." However, the question now is what will be done with that information in the next session. Ellis is optimistic there will be meaningful reform. not least due to Perry's imminent retirement. Ellis said, "I think there's been some reticence on the right to attack what

> is a signature piece of legislation for the governor. With him leaving office, folks that might have bitten their tongues in the past probably don't feel they have to anymore."

> House Speaker Joe Straus has convened a Select Committee on Economic Development

Incentives, with the TEF, ETF, and METF squarely in its sights. Rep. Eddie Rodriguez, D-Austin, is a member of that committee, and said that, so far, it has engaged primarily in "sit-down learning sessions" with the fund administrators, beneficiaries, and critics.

Rodriguez said he is not dogmatically opposed to such incentives, but he worries that the state has never undertaken serious cost-benefit analyses, measuring not just how much money for how many jobs, but the total cost to taxpayers - state and local



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MONEY FOR NOTHING CONTINUED FROM P.44 incentives, lost taxes, and added expenses. The auditors' report, which he called "damning," has certainly added urgency to the

questioning. While he agrees with Wheat that the office has improved, he still wants it to adopt best practices, and believes that the political climate next session will be more inclined to enact reforms than under Perry. Among moderates in both parties that want reform, and the hardliners in both

parties that want government out of the incentives game, he expects an omnibus reform bill. Ultimately, he would like to see something closer to the performancebased process adopted by the city of Austin. "Year one, you get this amount of money. Year two, you don't, depending how it goes."

Some Democrats may also argue that the GOP is late to the party. In 2011, Davis challenged her Republican colleagues on why they were so determined to protect the TEF when they were slicing billions from public school funding. More recently, she has questioned exactly why Attorney General Greg Abbott failed to investigate whether these failures were signs of incompetence or malfeasance. Moreover, like Perry's, Abbott's donor list

includes TEF recipients such as Bank of America. In an October 8 statement, Davis said, "Greg Abbott has taken more than \$1.4 million in campaign contributions from the very companies he's supposed to be watching."

Democrats argue that this wasn't a simple failure to do his job. In 2004, responding to a public information request about the fund from the Dallas Morning News, Abbott issued an opinion that the state could withhold applications from the media, as they might contain commercially sensitive information. However, included in that initial *DMN* request were questions about Vought Aircraft - one of the firms

that never submitted a formal application - leaving Abbott in the absurd position of sealing documents that didn't actually exist. Six Texas Congressional members have recently penned a letter to the U.S. Attorney General's office, requesting a full investigation of potential criminal malfeasance at both the TEF and Abbott's office.

Meanwhile, Dukes voiced her own frustration that Abbott's office has spent time on nuisance lawsuits against the body politic,

> such as prosecuting Planned Parenthood with claims of Medicaid fraud, or defending the state's voter ID law, rather than investigating serious allegations of white collar crime perpetrated against the state. Wheat echoed Dukes' concerns, with an added tone of wry disbelief. He said, "This attorney general has spent an inordinate amount of time bragging about suing the federal government over EPA regulations about greenhouse gases and Obamacare and this and that. Would some of that time have been better spent looking at things in his own backyard?"

So the big question remains: Should legislators try to fix the program, or get out of business incentives altogether? That's where Wheat and many other critics of the TEF diverge. Ellis

said that, while there are lawmakers who want to end state incentives, he leans toward simply cleaning up the process. Likewise in the House, the main thrust of Speaker Straus' Select Committee on Economic Development Incentives seems to be to reform rather than dismantle the fund. Similarly, Democratic comptroller hopeful Mike Collier has campaigned that he would be the best candidate to fix a "broken financial compliance system." Even Davis has been too moderate for Wheat - he sees her, like so many of her colleagues, as more likely to aim at amending the state's system of corporate welfare, rather than simply to end it altogether.

The World **That Calls Itself** "the World"

The most significant sentence of the 20th century was written in 1950 by James Baldwin:

"The world is white no longer, and it will never be white again."

Baldwin knew most of this planet never was white. His declaration was for the world that calls itself "the world" - emphasis on "the." It was a world that called most of the planet the "Third World." There was no second. Only a world that called itself "the world" and a lesser world that came in third.

The world that calls itself "the world" is far more diverse now, because, as Baldwin knew, it wasn't strong enough to have its way, so it had to change.

But it's still the world that calls itself "the world" - that world reported in media 24/7 by reporters who cover only what their employers permit and only what their news culture recognizes as newsworthy. Most of them - not all of them - see only what their training allows them to see.

That leaves lots out. Unnoticed or denied by officialdom.

Wars, celebrities, disasters, stock markets, gruesomeness of all kinds, cat videos, terrorism (often unsubstantiated), Nobel

prizes, political theatrics the world that calls itself "the world" presents that stuff as foreground.

No. No. No. No.

A woman at the supermarket with two kids in the shopping cart and two straggling behind: That's the foreground.

Without them, nothing else happens.

Foreground is the happiest couples I've ever seen:

Boston, 1972: two brave and very "out" young lesbians boarding a trolley, on fire with delight.

Austin, 1975: two blind parents holding an infant, cane-crossing from UT to Dobie Mall (not at the crosswalk!), shining love all over everything.

Without what those people radiated, what's the point?

And the Joe stuck in traffic driving to his second job. He does shitwork. If shitwork doesn't get done, you can't have a bourgeoisie or a 1%.

And the weeping next door, heard through the wall: She was the very young mother of a little girl; they'd be evicted in the morning.

They're the fucking foreground. All of them, by the millions.

The Polish poet Tadeusz Rózewicz fought Nazis and was a lifelong enemy of the world that calls itself "the world":

"I sat in the doorway of my house/ that old woman who/ is leading a goat by a rope/ is more necessary/ and more precious/ than the seven wonders of the world/ anyone who thinks and feels/ that she is not necessary/ is a mass murderer."

Rózewicz stands for what Pablo Neruda called "the world that is ours," where we actually live and where there is always vitality, possibility, immediate danger, and what Caroline Casey calls "dire beauty."

But it is hard to distinguish the world that calls itself "the world" from the world that is ours when most data comes from the world that calls itself "the world," which insists, as its first principle, that it is the only world, the world that counts, because it finds this and that reason to go to war, or this and that reason to save banks, or declares this book postmodern and that "avant-pop." Important because it invents the atomic bomb, jargon, and computers.

Noël Coward: "We've invented a few small things that make noises, but we haven't invented one large thing that creates quiet."

Willa Cather: "Give the people a new

word, and they think they have a new fact."

The real news is that the world that calls itself "the world" calibrates importance by two qualities only: violence and money, which are one and the same. Violence enforces the ways of money; money supports violence.

That is the alpha and omega of economics and politics. (As for culture: Beauty has a

way of finding its way – some of the time.)

The masses are working stiffs (white-collar professionals included), helpless to resist what surrounds them daily with so much force and noise. They go the way of the force and the noise, but they go troubled, uneasy, aware that this is not what they really desire, not how they want to be living.

If only they'd learn not to want what "the world" goads them to want.

When one learns not to, things get easier, looser, freer.

But here's Jan Kott (roughly remembered): "Shakespeare had no illusions. Not even the illusion that one can live without illusions."

So I wonder what new illusion I'm cooking up for myself here.

Having a stroke isn't good for much, but it helps with one's illusions.



Wrote it down. Didn't want it to disappear. (Understandings do disappear, you know and you don't even feel it as they go).

The note: "This [the stroke] is about cherishing."

After a stroke, you are quietly and/or loudly terrified.

You are suddenly and scarily surrounded 24/7 by the world that calls itself "the world" - diagnostic devices, bills, and the massive paraphernalia of linear thinking. Also, it's noisy. Nothing is noisier, or seems to take longer, than an MRI brain scan.

But when you look at that from "I am one who cherishes." the medical hoo-hah shifts into slo-mo to be seen for what it is: an earnest, primitive, insanely expensive, stab-inthe-dark attempt to understand.

A stab-in-the-dark attempt to understand - that's what I've done for a living. So, suddenly, the procedures are not alien. Cherishing reveals.

The worst moments these days aren't about me. The worst moments are when I look around at the world that calls itself "the world" and this hits:

We're capable of so much - and look what we've settled for.

(Mayer just came back from the dead and said, "If that doesn't break your heart, I don't want to be in the same room with you.")

Then I want a cigarette. Then I remember I don't smoke anymore.

The best thing about smoking was the mixed taste of American Spirit Blues and Bushmills Irish whiskey, when, as the lyric in the air."

Haven't missed the cigarettes, and the doctors say whiskey is good for me (they really do), but I missed smoke trails curling in the half-light.

Then I remembered a thing George said: "You don't need a river to just sit and watch the river." You don't need to light a cigarette to watch the smoke curls rise. You just kind of go to where that happens inside you and let the moments take care of the rest.

Finally got George's old riddle. (He just came back from the dead laughing: "It took a stroke for you to figure that one out!?")

Stillness. Stillness. Without it, we pass ourselves by.

Nothing is more rare than stillness in the world that calls itself "the world" - for it is a vast machine that attacks stillness and instigates fear.

And does so for profit.


In its grip, this happenstance does not happen - a note written pre-stroke, when I still smoked:

"Hey, about 2am this morning, after a long day's work, 10 hours, WAY straining myself, probably just to prove I still could, I sat here alone in the half-light listening to wistful music composed by Charles Chaplin, sipping my whiskey, and smoking a couple of cigarettes, while one thought led to another until I found myself sort of standing outside myself and laughing, laughing as hard as ever I've laughed – at myself. For no particular reason. Just laughing at myself, as though I'd just gotten the punch line of a joke heard long ago."

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Eye of the Beholder

The Osiligi Maasai Warrior choir, from Kenya, in ornate, mystifying native costumes and uncalled-for headdresses, happened to be touring the UK this fall, coinciding with the recent Paris Fashion Week in which the most celebrated designers from the "developed" world exhibited their wares, which often seemed as excessive as the Maasais'. Examples: Rei Kawakubo's "Blood and Roses," a red KKK-type swaddling robe with face-obscuring, pointy hood; Sarah Burton's skirt of oversized petals, accessorized with skull cap and chin strap; Junya Watanabe's dress with huge plastic puff sleeves of red and blue - and vinyl see-through helmet; and Julie de Libran's gown with earmuff-like chest coverings. The week ended with a street march of "Chanel girls" (most, Caucasian) dressed as garishly as the African Maasais. (Bonus: Some designers delightfully offered explanations of their often-inexplicable works.)

Government in Action

Oops: The rural municipality of Hanover, Manitoba, has prohibited alcohol sales for more than a century – or at least that's what everyone in the community believed as recently as 2006 when the last attempt was made to repeal the ban (and failed by 30 votes). However, town officials finally decided recently to research the prohibition (examining records back to 1880) and in July revealed, astonishingly, that no city bylaw exists making the town dry. At least one restaurateur is expected to start serving booze soon.

In August, Katja Kipping, the leader of Germany's largest opposition party (the liberal Die Linke), proposed to grant all welfare families a cash voucher of the equivalent of about \$640 in order to allow each a summer vacation. "For me," she said, "the holidays of my childhood are among the most beautiful memories," and she is saddened that "3 million children this summer cannot experience what a holiday means."

Wait, What!

In October in Gresham, Ore., a 21-year-old man openly carrying a handgun he had just bought was robbed, at gunpoint, the same day. According to the police report, the robber apparently thought the victim's gun was nicer than his own: "I like your gun. Give it to me."

New World Order: In September, Dr. Sean Perry of the Marathon (Florida) Veterinary Hospital saved the life of Buttercup, an orange tabby who needed blood – by giving him a transfusion from a West Palm Beach dog blood bank. According to the U.S. National Library of Medicine, 62 cats have been known to receive such "xenotransfusions," and cats are apparently the only animals (besides dogs) that can safely process dog blood.

Legal Technicalities

When a van on official business for the city of St. Paul, Minn., accidentally hit Megan Campbell's Nissan Pathfinder in August, Campbell, naturally, filed a claim against the city for the \$1,900 damage – normally just a cost of business for a city and one of about 400 claims St. Paul has processed this year.

However, the van happened to be driven by the same Megan Campbell, an employee of St. Paul Parks and Recreation, who apparently could not avoid hitting her own parked SUV. At press time, the city was investigating but expected to handle the claim as routine.

Too Much Information

Pauline Chai and her estranged husband, Khoo Kay Peng (a Laura Ashley executive), are battling in a London courtroom in a very expensive divorce, with the current issue to determine whether the English judge has jurisdiction instead of courts in the couple's native Malaysia. In the course of bringing the British judge up-to-date, Chai casually described how she has supported her husband's relentless nature – by revealing that he would do copious amounts of work (for four hours at a time) at home while sitting on the toilet. Khoo "got backache there," she said, "so I got the idea of [a] padded toilet seat" for him.

Leading Economic Indicators

The former chairman of the Federal Reserve, Ben Bernanke, revealed at an October conference in Chicago that even though his post-government income will be several times what he earned as Fed chairman, he was nonetheless rejected recently when he tried to refinance his Washington, D.C., home. Mortgage-lending is so highly computerized, he was told, dictated by formulas, that he apparently got caught in an algorithm. Despite a probably seven-figure book contract and six-figure public speeches, he is no longer "employed" in a steady job, which apparently caused a computer program to signal him as too risky.

Cries for Help

Victor Thompson, 46, arrested in St. Petersburg, Fla., in October for possession of the synthetic marijuana called Master Kush Spice (which he insisted is legal in his native New Hampshire), is apparently an out-of-control New England Patriots fan – having tattooed his entire bald head with a painstaking replica of quarterback Tom Brady's helmet. The attention to detail on the authentic design and colors is remarkable, including subtle add-ons such as the American flag, NFL logo, and helmet manufacturer (Riddell). Not only is Brady's "12" properly placed, so is the green dot identifying the "helmet" as radio-ready for messages from the sideline.

Police in Minneapolis arrested Nicholas Mullenmaster, 38, in October as the man who inexplicably flushed nails and other pieces of metal down toilets of several restaurants since August, causing "thousands of dollars" in damage. In most incidents, two to three pounds of nails clogged the toilets, requiring plumbing repair charges of up to \$1,000 each, but at one Starbucks, a wall had to be removed. Although witnesses and surveillance video seemed to identify Mullenmaster as the culprit, he denied any involvement, and thus no motive for the toilet attacks has emerged.





Roll Over, Beerthoven

THE SAENGERRUNDE'S NEW SERIES TURNS CLASSICAL MUSIC'S "THREE Bs" INTO BREZELS. BIER, AND BOWLING

We all proudly tout Austin as the live music capital of the world, but German immigrants began making music here before it was even cool. When they settled in Central Texas in the mid-1850s, they sang to preserve and honor their cultural heritage. In 1852, these Texasdeutschen had already formed a chorus, and by 1879, they formally created the Saengerrunde - arguably Austin's first "local band."

The Saengerrunde still exists today, making it Austin's oldest ethnic organization. The group maintains both male and female choirs, but it also manages non-music events that help to celebrate German traditions.

About a year ago, pianist Daniel Swayze started accompanying the Maennerchor (men's choir) and found its Monday night rehearsals to be a blast - equal parts music, beer, and camaraderie, with the emphasis on the joy of sharing music with others. He thought it would be great to bring that energy and laid-back vibe to an actual concert, so he asked about holding a performance in the historic choir rehearsal room. Because the Saengerrunde was founded on the love of German music, this would represent a new way to celebrate this delight with the public. The board enthusiastically approved. It even invested in a sonorous Bosendorfer piano and outfitted the room with acoustical improvements.

Within short order, the Beerthoven Concert Series was born - an ongoing presentation of great music by German-speaking composers, with lied (song) and chamber music for small ensembles performed in an intimate setting. The concept, Swayze explains, "is to encourage an open atmosphere, like what a house concert would have felt like when this music was first performed." The small venue creates an environment where people should feel comfortable letting their guard down.

Adding to the concerts' casual mood are some other Saengerrunde amenities. The Saengerrunde owns neighboring Scholz Garten and a Big Lebowski-style bowling alley - one of the oldest continuously operating in the U.S. These extra-musical perks are open throughout the program, so concertgoers can hit a strike as the musicians strike a chord. Moreover, Swayze has broken the program into 20-minute sets - bite-sized chunks of music with plenty of time between for the audience to grab pretzels, refill drinks, and

chat. For the first concert, held this summer, he also enhanced the festive air with performances of German folk songs and classical drinking songs.

For the second concert, taking place this Sunday, Herr Swayze called upon Julie Fiore, Austin's resident opera renegade, to add some experimental flair. Fiore is the founder and director of One Ounce Opera, a self-proclaimed "punk" ensemble that reimagines and performs opera for novel contexts and audiences. In just a few years of existence, 000 has performed music that's run the gamut from Mozart to Queen, in bars and in

The group readily accepted the challenge to create an Oktoberfest spirit at this concert. Fiore worked with a vocal quartet to arrange excerpts from Johann Strauss' Die Fledermaus – an opera she chose specifically because of its famous party scene. They'll be injecting some interactive party games into the performance, though Fiore is quick to point out that this isn't as gratuitous and gimmicky an approach to audience fun as it might sound. "Because this opera has a lot of dialogue, there is a long performance practice of switching things up and throwing in some extra," she says. "This is already part of the tradition of this work." She wouldn't offer any more details for fear of spoiling the surprise, but she adds that "oohing and ahhing is encouraged."

Other works on this all-Deutsche program include music by classical's "Three Bs": movements of Brahms' Hungarian Dances for violin and piano, a solo suite for violin by Bach, and Beethoven's Piano Sonata, Op. 101. Food, drinks from Scholz Garten, and bowling are included in the price of the ticket. By the time 000 comes out for the final act, Swayze predicts that the concert will "degenerate into a drunken party." Now, that's a whole new interpretation on "authentic performance practice." Prost!

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

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Fresh Blood

The musical version of *Carrie*, no longer a legendary flop, makes a timely debut in Austin

One of the most unsettling musicals in theatre history is the original Broadway version of Carrie, but not because it was based on the first published novel of horror and suspense author Stephen King. Although the content was frightening, the direction of the show's 1988 New York premiere was bewilderingly uneven: Some scenes were touching and well-performed, but it had numerous flaws, including an abstract design concept, outlandish special effects, and a misguided number about killing a pig. As a result, the production, which ran for only four days after it opened, gained almost legendary flop status. But as befits a show with supernatural elements, Carrie the musical wouldn't die. The show was repeatedly reworked over the years, and a major overhaul resulted in a 2012 off-Broadway staging that was received much more positively than its premiere. Fortunately for theatregoers in the Texas state capital, Austin Theatre Project is presenting this gripping - if still challenging new incarnation, the play's local debut. (A production by Woodlawn Theatre in San Antonio began performances last week.)

"When I heard the new version, I was just blown away by the way the music had been completely reworked, and I liked the sound, I liked the feel, I liked all the new songs," explains ATP Artistic Director David Blackburn, who serves as the show's music director. The score that attracted Blackburn has lyrics by Dean Pitchford and music by Michael Gore, who together won an Oscar for the theme song to the movie Fame (the stage musical adaptation of which will be produced later this season by the University of Texas Department of Theatre & Dance). ATP Executive Director Barbara Schuler saw the revised iteration in New York and was so excited about the piece that she and Blackburn decided to mount it as soon as the rights were released. In Not Since Carrie, a chronicle of Broadway flops, journalist and theatre historian Ken Mandelbaum wrote of the 1988 musical, "Half of it is thuggish camp, half of it is gorgeous music theatre." Camp isn't part of this vision for Carrie; rather, ATP is finding

into the future, setting it in the present. Blackburn notes that the production feels especially current: "We have incredible [actors] who have really taken the characters and brought them into modern times." He adds that the performers create this immediacy in part through acting choices that the script doesn't necessarily indicate. "There's one character who's constantly on her cell phone, taking selfies, posting them on Instagram."

What accounts for this particularly contemporary flair? Blackburn credits director Jeff Hinkle, who is staging his third ATP show, after Falsettos (2013) and Corpus Christi (2012, the theatre's inaugural production). Hinkle, says Blackburn, brings out the actors' creativity by allowing them the freedom to make discoveries about their characters. But he also has a knack for building a unified ensemble, Blackburn suggests, a task no doubt made easier here by the presence of other artists who, like Hinkle, are returning to ATP: Rachel Hoovler (National Pastime, Avenue Q), Amanda Serra (Godspell), and Wendy Jo Cox (Godspell, National Pastime, Baby).

One newcomer is Audrey Johnson, who couldn't be more excited about performing the eponymous role of the young woman with telekinetic powers. Originally from Pflugerville, Johnson moved to New York City and now lives in Nashville, but she came back for this opportunity. She knew Blackburn and Schuler before they founded ATP, and when she learned that they were producing Carrie, she jumped at the chance to play this part. "Carrie goes through such an emotional journey. That's hard to find in musical theatre," Johnson comments. "There's not a lot of musicals out there that are really gritty." Before being cast, she hadn't read the book or seen any of the movie versions. During the rehearsal process, Johnson did watch the well-known 1976 film - whose screenwriter, Lawrence D. Cohen, also penned the musical's libretto but only after poring over the novel first. King's prose unlocked key details of her

great resonance with issues facing society today. The title character, a high school student in a small New England town, exacts revenge on her community in response to her classmates' constant ridicule. "It's the kind of thing you hear all the time, with all the incidents that are going on in schools all over the country," observes Blackburn. "Usually the perpetrator has been a victim of bullying and teasing," he says, positing that this connection makes the piece unfortunately timely.

King set his 1974 novel in 1979, and the stage adaptation takes the story still further character, offers the actor. For instance, "There are a couple lines that I was doing aggressively or angrily," she says, "but in the way he actually wrote it, she's doing it internally or submissively." Preparing for this role has been rewarding, Johnson says, and the experience has pushed her as a performer. "It is by far the biggest challenge I have had as an actor, and I am so grateful to have been trusted with this opportunity."



When Trouble Puppet Theatre takes on Dr. Jekyll's dark tale, the villain may not be who you think



This Halloween, Henry Jekyll isn't the only one cooking up something fiendish in lab. Connor Hopkins, Austin's mad scientist of the puppetry arts, is back in his workshop with another work of literature strapped to the slab. He's been cutting off parts, attaching new ones, and conducting crazed experiments on this inanimate block of prose so as to transform it into something odd, original, and (cue the lightning) alive!

You may recall Hopkins' previous efforts in this vein, with Upton Sinclair's The Jungle, Russell Hoban's RiddleyWalker, and Mary Shelley's Frankenstein. The results have been consistently compelling, in part because Hopkins feels so little compulsion to be totally faithful to his source. If he sees the story tending toward the tedious or anti-dramatic, as with Frankenstein, he thinks nothing of grafting onto the theatrical body an unexpected new plot development, such as, say, shuttling Shelley's reanimated creature off to Paris to get caught up in the French Revolution. It's a sort of jolt of new life into dead tissue that Victor

Frankenstein himself would appreciate.

Now, the Trouble Puppet Theatre Company artistic director has turned his unorthodox methods of adaptation on another man of science whose venture to unlock a secret of human existence unleashed something horrific: that very Dr. Jekyll. Just in time for our culture's annual dabble with the dark side, Trouble Puppet will premiere its version of Robert Louis Stevenson's tale of the man who was his own evil twin. And true to form, Hopkins is making the story his own, giving the bad boy top billing: The Strange



Austin Chronicle: You've stated elsewhere that the original story's big reveals -Jekyll is Hyde! We all have a dark side! - are no longer the big surprises or scary notions they once were. So why adapt it at all? What's the scary part of the story for you now?

Connor Hopkins: I took the notion that everyone has another side to them and sort of ran with it. So in our version, Jekyll's not the only one with secrets or secret lives. Nobody is what they appear to be, and the atmosphere of uncertainty and paranoia that creates is the scary part. That and the murders

AC: With Frankenstein and this, you're working with stories where the horror's rooted in psychological metaphors. But you've also injected into your work recurring political themes. Will we see some of that here?

CH: Oh yeah. The old demons are all here: class, social engineering, exploitation. You name it.

AC: The title's a pretty good clue that this won't be your standard telling of

Stevenson's story. Why give pride of place to Mr. Hude?

CH: The further I got into the story, the more it seemed to have a class-conflict element - unsurprisingly, I suppose, given my inclinations. (You know what they say: When you've got a hammer, everything looks like a nail.) The relationship between Jekyll and his servants took on some prominence, and it occurred to me that, in a way, Hyde was also a servant, used by Jekyll for his own purposes. So Hyde became my working-class hero and Jekyll the aristocratic antagonist.

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Killer Outfits: Jennifer Connelly in Phenomena

I kicked off this series with speculations about Giorgio Armani's influence on Hellbound: Hellraiser II, but in fact, Armani has done scads of real film costuming since American Gigolo. Predictably, most of it is men's suiting; last year, headlines touted Elysium's Jodie Foster as "the first leading lady to be outfitted by Armani."

Not so! The first was Jennifer Connelly, in the 1985 Dario Argento horror film Phenomena.

Connelly, like Foster, grew up onscreen. She was 15 in Phenomena, her second film, sandwiched between Sergio Leone's gangster epic Once Upon a Time in America and Jim Henson's Labyrinth (the costumes for which, incidentally, made a lasting impression on women my age. Two words: Bowie's trousers). In Phenomena, Connelly plays Jennifer Corvino, the daughter of a famous American film actor sent to a Swiss boarding school where she is taunted for her sleepwalking disorder by accented mean girls and a sadistic headmistress. As in Argento's earlier masterpiece Suspiria, girls at the school disappear one by one to an eerie Goblin score (augmented here by Iron Maiden and Motörhead). Jennifer's sleepwalking is mysteriously linked to her nascent psychic connection with insects, which she explores with the help of a wheelchair-bound forensic entomologist played by Donald Pleasence.

Despite Connelly's willingness to discuss her most humiliating early roles (Career Opportunities, anyone?), Phenomena comes up so rarely in interviews that it seems likely the topic has been made off-limits. That must be it, because every interviewer staring into those limpid gray eyes has to be thinking the exact same thing: "Did a chimp





really bite your finger off during the filming of Phenomena?"

Oh, did I forget to mention Inga the chimp? I don't want to spoil Inga's role in Phenomena. The story is that Argento urged Connelly to turn the chimp toward the camera during an early scene, Inga retaliated, a hospital reattached the digit, and shooting proceeded as before. (This rumor, while hard

to substantiate, is believable; actress Daria Nicolodi, who had a daughter with Argento, describes his animal-handling skills as limited to handing Inga a straight razor and inciting a chimp freak-out.) If you were Connelly, this might just be the sort of trauma vou wouldn't want to linger on. It is, in a word, undignified.

And Connelly really brings the dignity, even in

Phenomena, whether she's driving a beetle to erotic frenzy or eating baby food out of the jar with the end of a toothbrush. (Yep. That happens.) The Armani costumes look predictably sexy on Nicolodi and the chic, bitchy headmistress, but young Jennifer also wears conspicuous Armani, including a sweatshirt embossed on the back with a giant gold eagle (the Armani logo), a pair of signature high-waisted pleated trousers, and an allwhite outfit she wears throughout the climactic horror sequence. Consisting of an oversized white blouse, long white tie, and full, drop-yoked white skirt, it's clearly meant to evoke a schoolgirl uniform, and it's not much different from the other schoolgirl costumes.

But Connelly stands out from her classmates, who are infatuated with the Bee Gees

and Richard Gere. (Jennifer can't lust over movie stars because remember? Her dad's one.) The eagle-logo sweatshirt makes her look golden-winged, stately and angelic, an impression reinforced by the fact that she's lit as if glowing from within. On Connelly, the Armani schoolgirl outfit looks at once impossibly sophisticated and willfully naive.

In interviews, Connelly has compared herself at that age to a puppet, saying she mimicked the adults around her whenever she didn't know what to do. She was proud of pleasing them, proud of being a "good girl," proud of her reputation as punctual, professional, and endlessly compliant. So compliant that at 14 she would, if asked, willingly manhandle a chimpanzee strong enough to tear her arms off, and suffer the consequences without complaint.

It's Connelly's ability to weather and navigate through the destructive forces of warped masculinity represented in Once Upon a Time in America, Phenomena, and Labyrinth that distinguishes and elevates her performances in that early trio of films. Spectacularly wooden, literally sleepwalking through parts of Phenomena, she nevertheless anchors it with dignity and grace. It's the hinge between her performance for Leone - a literal peepshow in which she practices ballet stiffly while a young gangster watches through a chink in the wall - and her performance in Labyrinth, in which a teenager throws the words "You have no power over me" at a controlling male with a monster bulge. Jennifer never whines in Phenomena, no matter how many of her girlfriends get impaled before her eyes. When she feels that life isn't fair, she gets on the phone with her father's solicitor and requests a wire transfer. As bad leads to worse, and worse leads to a pit of liquefying corpses, she never once panics, but instead shows infinite, almost narcotized resourcefulness.

> Perhaps the most striking sequence is the one in which Jennifer, having discovered she's been poisoned, makes herself throw up in the bathroom sink. That look of calm, determined concentration on her face during the protracted and realistic scene - she tries multiple times, checks her vomit for the pill, and when she doesn't see it, swallows

water and tries again - is painful if you've either been or known a teenage girl who became too beautiful, too soon. In interviews, Connelly routinely misstates her age in those early movies by two years, substituting 11 for 13, 14 for 16. Whether there's some industry-wide conspiracy to cover up her actual birth date, or, far more likely, she simply remembers her emotional age better than her real age, hardly matters. That eerie precociousness - the malleability of the actress combined with the rigidity of a deer in the headlights, her determination to survive the shitshow of the male gaze even if it means leaving a finger behind - is what made her a phenomenon.

Mr. Gynt's Wild Ride

Last Act Theatre Company provides a captivating intro to the epic that is *Peer Gynt*

Peer Gynt seems to be a play that your typical theatre enthusiast knows either very much or very little about. I will unabashedly admit to being on the latter end of that spectrum. I came to Last Act Theatre Company's production at the HOPE Outdoor Gallery with my rudimentary knowledge of Henrik Ibsen but absolutely no idea what to expect. For those like me, here's a crash course:

Peer Gynt is Ibsen's epic verse masterpiece, toeing the line between surrealism and naturalism. We witness many episodes in the title character's life, some familiar (a marriage, the death of a parent) and some

considerably less so (encountering troll kingdoms, conversations with the metaphysical "Bøyg"). Last Act does a lovely job of immersing us in Peer's strange universe as we join him on a journey that may not have a destination after all.

Perhaps paradoxically, Ibsen's gorgeous verse practically begs to be staged, yet with the text in its entirety taking around five

hours to perform, doing so is quite an ambitious undertaking. Though it might sound strange to complain about a production running only three hours, at times I might

have preferred fewer cuts here, had the missing bits' inclusion helped better my understanding of the plot. Director Bridget Farias Gates states in the program that each cut made was a "wound to [her] heart." I believe that

> the audience suffers along with her, as these omissions sometimes give the play a bit of a rushed feel - an issue that might not exist had venue restrictions not imposed strict time constraints on the production.

Watching Andrew Bosworth's tireless Peer Gynt dart from scene to scene on his quest for meaning is not only delightful, but downright impressive. Bosworth does it all: From moments requiring intense energy to those of self-examination, from falling in love to staring death in the face, from drunken carousals to the inevitable hangover - he carries us along for the ride and never fal-



ters. Hell, he hardly even leaves the stage. With the main actor ably soliloquizing and pontificating at length, it would be easy, and perhaps expected, for the ensemble to fall flat by comparison. While Bosworth may stand out among his fellows - and how could he not? Allow me to reiterate that this guy is running a marathon here – his castmates skillfully avoid this pitfall. Whether working together in true ensemble fashion or as stand-alone characters encountered along Peer's way, this group helps fuel Bosworth's fire. Of particular note are Taylor Flanagan as Peer's endearing wife Solveig; Fritz Ketchum, who delivers a chilling portrayal of Peer's mother, Åse; and Susan Bennett, whose

performance as Anitra, a thieving Bedouin temptress, is nothing short of hilarious.

The play's naturalistic language and locales certainly make an outdoor production a logical choice. The HOPE Gallery, however, may not be the perfect fit. External noise proves a bit distracting, and the graffiti backdrop makes an odd pairing for Ibsen's stylized verse, though perhaps it complemented the more surrealistic moments. Still, Gates' direction is quite smart, expertly utilizing the space to further engage the audience. Overall, Last Act's production serves as a captivating introduction to a piece that is deservedly beloved by many, myself now included.

Mythologies and fables underlie our lives. The big ones, the ancient ones, are vast networks of interconnected fictions bubbled up from our earliest human cultures to bleed and blur, saturated by time, across geographical borders. The smaller ones, the younger ones, are less diluted by global and temporal dispersion, are deepest and brightest around the epicenters of community and families and idiosyncratic individuals that birthed them.

You're going to see a lot of mythologies and fables on the walls of grayDUCK Gallery during this latest exhibition, "Heirloom," that features the artwork of Megan Kimber and Adrian Landon Brooks.

You're going to see evocations of distinct people in the works of Kimber, people with enigmatic and fantastic backstories alluded to in the time-frozen snapshots of their lives, captured by the artist in subtle watercolors to which shreds of fabric and odd found objects have been added for a diversity of effect. "I paint these intense, moody little characters with delicate curved lines and aged ink washes," says Kimber, "which parallel the layers, fault lines, and intricacies within each breath and moment of a human being," Your own human mind, if it tries to formulate a description to later pass along to friends,

may conjure Brian Froud undergoing a series of precise creative seizures in an abandoned lace factory.

You'll witness icons and archetypes, whether figurative or structural, in the starker compositions of Brooks, rendered with stunning, geometric precision upon a variety of materials - modern poster paper, antique greeting cards, sections of weathered wooden boards - blazing like artifacts lifted from the walls of some Jodorowsky version of a Greek Orthodox church. "When I strip a painting down to its bare bones, it helps me think more intently about the impact of each line or stroke," says Brooks. "I find satisfaction in creating simple and concise works that convey universal messages of loss, love, and redemption." Some of these works are small enough to frame on a desktop; others can anchor even a vast expanse of wall; all burn darkly with pattern and color and the suggestion of centuries of tradition abstracted to strongest graphic impact.

This "Heirloom" is a valuable exhibition, bequeathed to the public through the fourth Sunday in November. We think that, if you treat yourself to a visit, you'll have another thing to be traditionally thankful for during the upcoming holiday. - Wayne Alan Brenner

"MATTHEW GENITEMPO AND BRYAN SCHUTMAAT: MOTOR CHRONICLES"



Matthew Genitempo and Bryan Schutmaat create beautiful images, and "Motor Chronicles" does not deviate from the richly picturesque collections the two photographers have independently cultivated over the years. Both artists blend portraiture and large-scale landscape photography, creating an edifying approach to their subjects both as autonomous individuals and products of their environments. We've seen this before in Schutmaat's Grays the Mountain Sends, and a quick look at Genitempo's Instagram feed renders many similar images: serene-looking glimpses into the people and places that shape our country.

But "Motor Chronicles" shies away from broadening its perspective. In their work, both Genitempo and Schutmaat tend to capture an emotionless state. The people they photograph are caught in a glazed-over stare. Chairs sit upright alongside the straight wooden line of Seventies siding in a motel room. There are few personal mementos or touches

that draw the viewer in. The look is heavily art-directed, so much so that the impact of the content is lost to the overall aesthetic. In short, the clarity of the visual, which is by no means an easy mark to hit, unfortunately overwhelms the narrative.

Genitempo and Schutmaat maintain a reserved and distant approach to their subjects, and it hinders the audience's ability to build intimacy with the work. This tactic renders the photographed individuals as placeholders to represent the larger canvas of work. Again, these pieces strike every chord visually. The colors are exquisite, the framing is just right. But in their perfection, there is a stagnancy. "Motor Chronicles" captures the encompassing remoteness of the American West but lacks the nuance that would allow these photographs to tell a greater story. We're left enjoying the images but craving more information about what makes these people and places so remarkable. - Caitlin Greenwood



The Buggy Barn Museum in Blanco is the rest home for several Hollywood character actors, but that's not the reason you should visit. The only way this timeline of horse-drawn transportation could be more complete is if the horses were there to pet and ogle, too.

Attached to the shafts of one of the carriages is a curtain of rawhide thongs used to keep flies off the horses. When you consider all the difficulties in travel of the era, it's tough to get too nostalgic for a time before the combustion engine became our beast of burden.

The big wheels, graceful curves, and pleated seats shaped by old-world craftsmen are a work of art. Along with the shiny carriages appearing in the movies Abraham Lincoln: Vampire Hunter and Lonesome Dove are the foot warmers and rain curtains that were part of the reality of driving a buggy.

It's interesting to see the early works of Studebaker and Fisher Body, but it's good that the companies went on to develop a more comfortable mode of travel. Looking at the prairie schooner and thinking of the mountainous West, the question comes to mind: How did they do it?

The Buggy Barn Museum is on the north side of Blanco at 1915 U.S. 281. Open Monday through Saturday, the barn contains more than 100 carriages from the 1800s to early 1900s parked axle to axle. For more information, call 830/833-5708 or go to www.buggybarnmuseum.com.

Formula One

Smaller engine, same power. F1 cars have always pushed the technological envelope, but this year, you can hear the difference. Gone is the signature "jam jar full of angry hornets" shriek of the old eight-cylinder 2.3 liter engine, replaced with the trilling purr of the newly mandated six-cylinder 1.6 liter. A lot of fans and drivers complain it just doesn't sound like F1 anymore, but with added turbos, and energy recovery from both brakes and exhaust, the speed that Texas fans grew accustomed to over the last two seasons at the Circuit of the Americas is still there. That said, they'd better get used to different faces on the podium. After four years of total domination by Sebastian Vettel and team Red Bull, Mercedes sealed the deal on the constructor's championship two weeks ago in Russia. Now the fight is over who comes out as top driver: Either way, it'll be a Mercedes logo on their fire-retardant suit, with Brit Lewis Hamilton inching toward his second championship, and his German teammate Nico Rosberg pushing hard. With three races left in the season - Austin, Brazil, and Abu Dhabi - there's still time for a lead change, and COTA's notorious, dizzying turn one could be the place Rosberg pushes to the front of the pack. - Richard Whittaker

Texas makes the trip to Lubbock this weekend with the lowest expectations they could possibly carry. The Longhorns are a 24.5-point underdog to the Red Raiders, and we swear that ain't a typo. Maybe someone could explain how a team like **Texas Tech**, who's coming off of a 55-point loss to TCU, can be a 24.5 favorite to a team they're trailing in the Big 12.

It figures to be a blackout for the fans in terms of their fans' attire and state of consciousness. The Longhorns should expect a hostile environment.


Charlie Strong admitted that he hasn't done a great job coaching this year, and if he loses to the Red Raiders

One for the Books

THE HIT THE SPOT CAFE DOES JUST THAT

The Garfield Public Library is the unlikely source of the best chicken-fried steak and onion rings I've eaten in the last 30 years or so. Tucked inside, the Hit the Spot Cafe is run by Jessie and Jennifer Solis; Jessie has 39 years of restaurant experience, starting

with the old Magic Time Machine. The cafe has been open for four years right on the north frontage road of Highway 71. 6 miles east of Austin-Bergstrom International Airport. It's a mystery how I haven't heard about it before, since the food is so delicious and well-crafted. "We just want to make simple food that makes people happy," says Jessie. We are very happy indeed.

The first visit we had an amazing chicken-fried

steak (\$7.99, with two sides) that was ethereal: a fork-tender, beefy-tasting fresh steak hand-breaded with a thin, crispy crust, and a rich, creamy gravy. It came with garlicky Texas toast, real fried okra, and mac and cheese like Grandma's. The huge basket of onion rings (\$4.99) may have been even better, with sweet, moist onions surrounded by a perfect crispy batter - not too thin, not too thick,

and not falling off. The bacon cheeseburger (\$7.69) is magnificent, with a medium-rare 8-ounce Angus patty and smoked bacon slices, on a bun that tastes home-baked (with crispy fries). A peach cobbler with Blue Bell was so good it rivaled that of the legend-

ary Southern Dinette on Fast 11th.

On subsequent trips I've tasted the unctuous carne guisada (\$9.24). an ample portion of stewed beef cubes that melt in your mouth, and the Tex-Mex enchiladas (\$8.99), three picadillofilled enchiladas in a gravylicious lake of goodness. I've had the Angus hamburger steak (\$8.99), smothered in brown onion gravy, with peas and fried corn, and loved it. They do breakfast, which I've

heard raves about (their biscuits are flaky and buttery). The catfish looks amazing, and the corn dog appears to be hand-dipped. They do meat-and-two-sides specials during the week, and Friday night is steak night (a work buddy had the 12-ounce rib eye last week and gushed about it). It's a roadside bookworm's delight with fresh food that's simply prepared, and served with a big smile. - Mick Vann

AUSTIN'S ARTISAN CHOCOLATE boom continues with the opening of **Chocolaterie Tessa** (7425 Burnet Rd.) where second-generation chocolatier Tessa Halstead is creating custom truffles, bon bons,



seasonal molded chocolate items, and all kinds of chocolate-covered treats. Halstead grew up around her father Rex Morgan's chocolate shop in Dallas and attended the Barry Callebaut Chocolate Academy in Chicago. She will celebrate the grand opening of her shop on Wednesday, Nov. 5.

CHERRYWOOD, MUELLER, and Wilshire Wood residents are eagerly awaiting the grand opening of the 27th outlet of Torchy's Tacos (1801 E. 51st) on Thursday, Nov. 20. The new restaurant features the interior design of the company's future outlets including a full bar, but also offers a shaded dining patio overlooking Bartholomew Park.

CARLOS RIVERO'S El Chile restaurant group is busy this week with the opening of a new El Chilito (1623 E. 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There's Brisket in That Cider

How Austin Eastciders put a Texas twist on apple hooch

If you grew up in the heart of the UK's cider country, you might've heard horror stories about dead rats thrown into the cider vats. In Texas we don't have many rats, but we do have cows. So if some maniac is going to be throwing meat into cider, it should probably be brisket.

To celebrate Austin Beer Week, Austin Eastciders have crafted a special cider to be released on Halloween night that's been fermented with Micklethwait Craft Meats burnt ends, but their Texas connections don't stop there. Before prohibition, cider was the most popular alcoholic spirit in the Americas, and it was common for Austinites to produce their own. A catalog from a Hyde Park nursery dating to 1895 advertised Winesap apple trees as highly prized for cidermaking. Eastciders is now using the very same Winesaps in a small-batch, single variety cider.

Although the taste might've been familiar to those patronizing Barton Springs in the 19th century, Eastciders Winesap is unique in today's cider landscape because most ciders are blends. Unlike wine, it's rare to find an apple variety with the right balance of flavor. At first Eastciders wasn't sure that Winesap fit the bill, but after nine months of aging, the eggy aroma was subdued by a pleasantly funky fermentation that brought out flavors of citrus, sugary bubblegum, and salt.

"It's like the margarita of ciders," says Eastciders founder Ed Gibson. "It has this slightly savory taste which I've never had in a cider before."

Finding a cider that can surprise Gibson is no small task. In 2006, the UK expat put his career as a music talent buyer on hold to found a cider bar in Bristol called the Apple. Built into a floating barge that formerly housed an S&M club, the Apple offered 40 varieties of bottled cider and seven rotating taps. They sourced much of their cider from local farms that had been following the same recipes since the 1600s.

Despite this rich cider history, the drink hasn't always been trendy in England. Until the early Aughties, cider was mostly associated with street drinkers because of the low cost and high alcohol content. But thanks to a perfect storm of trends that included a cider trailer at the Glastonbury Festival, the country's first organic cidermaker, and the popularity of the drink among ravers, cider was suddenly in fashion. Gibson saw the trend coming and jumped to fill the niche.

"You could go to a bar and try 100 Belgian beers, but not 10 ciders, even though the whole area was surrounded by cider farms. People didn't know about them, because the farms didn't have distribution networks,"

After a few successful years running the bar, Gibson grew tired of England

and was looking for a change. A friend recommended Austin, Gibson came for a short visit, then he packed his bags and moved to Texas to start a cider company.

If only it was that easy.

Fans of the cider can tell you that despite launching in 2011, Eastciders hasn't been fully available for three years. Gibson bootstrapped the first batches of Gold Top as proof of concept and landed it in bars like the Longbranch Inn and Cheer Up Charlie's, but the drink proved to be too popular for its own good, and soon the supply ran dry. Lacking the necessary funding and a proper production site, the stock of Eastciders would ebb and flow until the

company secured temporary production at a winery just north of Austin.

The production problems are now a thing of the past. With 48 tap handles across town, Eastciders recently claimed the title of most popular cider in Austin. It's hard to miss, thanks to a striking logo by typographer Simon Walker that invokes pre-Prohibition imagery, but even without the Design Sponge-worthy bottles, the flavors speak for themselves. Currently two versions are available commercially: the dry, crisp Eastciders Original that's made with Washington dessert and French bittersweet apples, and the 100% bittersweet Gold Top that has a powerfully divisive flavor.

"You either absolutely love it or hate it, but you can't please everyone," says Gibson.

Until now, they haven't had the capacity to produce more than the two varieties, but the opening of a dedicated production facility in East Austin will change that. Lease negotiations lasted over two years, but they've finally moved into a Springdale Road warehouse across the street from the Canopy offices. They're the first tenants in a compound that will eventually include a distillery, brewery, rock climbing gym, and theatre.

The facility has a bit of hand-me-down charm thanks to a vintage bottling line, but otherwise it's all high-tech. The stainless steel wine tanks are imported from Italy and the state-of-the-art carbonator bubbles beverages at temperatures previously thought to be impossible. "It's like the holy grail of carbonation. It enables us to carbonate cider without it being quite so chilled, and with the Texas heat, that's really important," says Gibson.

Also crucial to a beverage maker in Austin is the ability to invite customers into their home for a drink, and soon Eastciders will be able to complement their cidery tours with a selection of limited edition batches poured from their neighboring taproom. The space's strange history matches the company's throwback tendencies. The building was actually a functioning railroad station shipped to Texas from Kansas by a wealthy train enthusiast. Now instead of selling tickets, the station will be tapping cider from a debut lineup including Eastciders Original and Gold Top, as well as new offerings like Oaked, Hopped, Texas Honey, and that mythical brisket cider.

For the past month, 10 pounds of Micklethwait burnt ends have been floating in cheesecloth inside tanks of French bittersweet apple concentrate. Instead of feeding on a diet of conventional yeast nutrients twice a day, the apple juice has been devouring the brisket at an alarming rate and began fermenting much quicker than usual. By the end of the process, they hope that some of the caramel and vanilla notes from the smoking process will linger alongside the beefy, black pepper flavor. If you don't think that could possibly taste good, you're not alone.

"I've been shocked, because originally I thought it was going to be more of a novelty thing," says Gibson. "But we all tried it two days into fermentation, and we realized this might be something that we could actually sell!"

Strangely enough, this Texas twist on cider actually has a historical precedent. Those tall tales of throwing rats into tanks are rooted in the prac-

tice of using beef as a substitute for yeast during the fermentation process, so Eastciders aren't the first to realize that cider has a taste for barbecue.

"We wanted to do something experimental, but also keep things traditional. I don't think anyone in this country has put meat in cider in 100 years, and it's probably been 50 in England," says Gibson.

The brisket cider is still patiently fermenting, so only time will tell if it tastes more like a pepper-crusted sugar cookie or a dirty pile of ash. Then once the limited edition cider is tapped, it will either become the stuff of legend - or of nightmare.









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






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Straight Outta Austin

SLAB'S NEW TAKE ON OLD-SCHOOL BARBECUE

Mark Avalos' first experience with barbecue success was a smoked pork shoulder he chopped up and served on sandwiches topped with a tangy coleslaw. The sandwiches were so well received they became Avalos' signature item, the dish around which the selftaught pit man would eventually build a barbecue business. Rather than adhere strictly to the Central Texas barbecue tradition, Avalos researched and dabbled in barbecue styles from around the American South while teaching himself the trade. Now, when asked to describe the style and flavor profile at SLAB (which stands for Slow, Low, and Bangin'), he responds, "It's Memphis meets Carolina meets Texas."

Avalos' first foray into the barbecue sandwich business was called the Sugar Shack, which morphed into a SLAB trailer in the UT campus area in 2013. In the summer of 2014, Avalos and his new business partners moved the SLAB into a brick-and-mortar location in a shopping center at one of Austin's busiest intersections. They've settled in and built a loyal lunch clientele and catering operation with the addition of a food truck for special events. Avalos says he'd like to reopen

the trailer near campus at some point, but it's on hiatus at the moment.

If you're looking for an atmosphere reminiscent of the rural Central Texas meatmarket tradition, you will not find it at SLAB. Avalos and his partners Rafael Robinson, Chip Osborne, and Chip Gourley set their sights on a different aesthetic. The interior decor and menu descriptions SLAB BBQ

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are an homage to Nineties street culture and urban graffiti - look for sandwiches called the Notorious P.I.G., the CHICK.N.W.A., and the Texas O.G. served in a dining room

with flat-screen TVs tuned to sports and original artwork by local graffiti artist Aaron Darling of SprATX. Since I'm somewhat of a barbecue traditionalist, the combination of a sports bar-like setting with a hip-hop theme struck me as odd, but the sandwiches were pretty good - once we got to them.

Our group arrived at SLAB at 6pm on a recent Saturday evening to find two large pick-up trucks parked blocking both the sidewalk and the curb cut necessary for handicapped access. Since one of my guests was

using a walker and I was on my scooter, this posed a problem. Oddly enough, we were told the trucks belonged to staff members and the business. Although one of the trucks was moved quickly, allowing employees to block access to the restaurant didn't strike me as a wise management decision in the first place.

Diners at SLAB go through a cafeteria-like line and the meats - brisket, pork, sausage, chicken, or St. Louis-style pork ribs - are chopped or sliced to order for sandwiches, wraps, or sliders. (Be advised that the constant chopping is part of the restaurant's ambient soundtrack.) Select sandwiches from the menu or design your own based on choices of meats, breads (Lil' Mama's Bakery white, wheat, or jalapeño cheddar buns, El Milagro tortillas), garnishes, and house-made sauces. Pair sandwiches with house side dishes or chips, then round out the meal with Cutie Pies or a selection of local craft beers

We tried the ribs, and a variety of sandwiches, plus all the house sides and sauces. The half-pound of pork ribs (\$8) was the unqualified hit at the table; lightly smoked under a crunchy layer of bark, they offered plenty of moist, tender meat and plenty of porky flavor. However, the sickly sweet fruit and habanero glaze served on the side was an unnecessary and unwelcome affront to the quality of the ribs. Reaction to most of the sides was unenthusiastic, but both the distinctive mustard slaw and the sweet, hearty baked beans passed muster with our group. My sandwich choice, El Jefe (\$7), featured

> tasty chopped brisket dressed with grilled onions, jalapeños, and a mantle of the house queso on a jalapeño cheddar bun. For the full effect, add a sprinkling of Fritos (50 cents) for crunch. It's a big, juicy, glori-

ously messy sandwich, but there are handy napkin dispensers on every table. The Texas Two-Step (\$7) was another popular option: a choice of one meat paired with slices of Smokey Denmark sausage, pickles, onions, and two of the house sauces. The Notorious P.I.G. (\$7) was a clear winner, with a big mound of sweet pulled pork crowned with the mustard slaw and a dousing of the house Backyard Red barbecue sauce - each bite revealing why Avalos has been able to build a business on this particular sandwich. - Virginia B. Wood

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

They Went to the Woods

HIDE AND SEEK: THE UTOPIAN REBELLION WILL BE IMPROVISED

Stop me if you've heard this one before. A group of photogenic young people tramp out into a rural wilderness, set themselves up in an isolated, probably abandoned old house, then eat, drink, and have sex until suddenly a mysterious "other" arrives. Violence may or may not ensue.

That's a fairly accurate description of everything from Sam Raimi's seminal Evil Dead to The Cabin in the Woods. It's also, however, a spoiler-free synopsis of the new film Hide and Seek, which, despite outward appearances, comes as somewhat more of a shock because it's not a horror film.

Directed by Joanna Coates and produced, co-written by, and co-starring former Austinite and Slacker 2011 co-producer Daniel Metz (the two are now married), Hide and Seek defies erroneous expectations with a story of youthful idealism that's more Henry David Thoreau than backcountry horror show.

Metz and his co-stars - Josh O'Connor, Rea Mole, Hannah Arterton, and Joe Banks rivet both the eye and the intellect with performances so daringly naturalistic and honest that John Cassavetes might well be applauding in his grave. In an era where gloomy dystopian futurism is the norm, Hide and Seek is ultimately a film about a utopian rebellion. After all, what does the pursuit of happiness really mean?

The Austin Chronicle spoke to Metz about the film, which recently won the Michael Powell Award for Best British Feature Film at the Edinburgh International Film Festival.

Austin Chronicle: Hide and Seek really caught me off guard. Maybe I've been watching too many Ti West films, but your film is totally transgressive in ways that are completely unexpected and defiantly uncliched.

Daniel Metz: One of the main ways that [the story] could've gone down was that the characters decided to leave or somebody went crazy, but I think that film's been made many times before and I don't know how much we need to put that energy out into the world. The idea that people who try new things will fail just doesn't seem very sophisticated to me. A friend of mine said that we've done the most subversive thing we could do, which is to give the film sort of a happy ending.

AC: How much of what's on the screen was improv and how much was scripted? Because rhythmically it flows exactly like real life. That's extremely difficult to capture.

DM: The script was just a 40-page outline, scene by scene with descriptions. We had a month rehearsal period with actors where we worked out each scene and also some that weren't in the movie but that we thought the characters would need to go through. So we figured out the rhythm of each scene and roughly what the dialogue would sound like, but once we were on set all the dialogue was improvised.

AC: Even though the characters are about as far away from society and social norms as possible, the emotions they're feeling and the conversations they have are pretty

momentous and reactionary. The absence of any sort of invasive technology is almost a character in itself.

DM: Absolutely. I think [the film] is about frustrated people who feel that there are things in the world today that are really alienating and discouraging. We had a scene in an early draft of the script where in the beginning they all take out their cell phones and smash them with hammers. Ultimately we thought that was a bit too over the top, but yeah, that was a big part of it.

At the same time, there are a lot of books and films about how when you feel that way disenfranchised, alienated – when you feel like the world around you is not made for you, you should act on it. Thus political activism comes about and a significant counterculture comes about through that. This has been the lesson of so many previous generations.

The characters in [Hide and Seek], however, are saying that, "We're going to retreat as a form of protest." They're not trying to make the world a better place, they're only trying to make themselves better, and they can't do that [individually]. It's an alternative to political action because it supposes that there's no way to make things better. That's an idea that resonates in a lot of ways. I certainly think that a lot of people feel that they can't do anything about the world today.

Be careful with this, GROOT. When it comes to social media, teachers are held to a higher standard than most professions. While this state of affairs does recognize the vital role teachers play in shaping young lives, we wonder why that recognition can't play out in the form of, say, higher salaries. Instead, we regularly see teachers fired or suspended for posting photos in swimsuits or with alcohol, or for complaining about their students on the Internet.

In theory, you can control which friends see certain Facebook posts. Here's how: First, organize your friend list, marking ex-students, older relatives who just don't understand, and weird stalker dudes as "Acquaintances." Then, on each post or photo, look for a menu where you can select "Friends Except Acquaintances" as your audience. Also, turn on Timeline Review in your privacy settings. That way, no tagged photos will slip through when you're away from your computer.

But if you go this route, GROOT, you may want to knock on wood. Facebook has a terrible track record of suddenly changing privacy settings, including on individual posts, to make them more public and thus increase its scope as a search service. We don't advise trusting them with your job security. Instead, we suggest you choose between the following priorities:

- 1) Put your ex-students first. Let them look up to you on Facebook as a model for an adult life that is not too, well, adult. In that case, skip the sexy tree costume.
- 2) Put yourself first. Have fun and be the messy twentysomething you have every right to be. To do that, you'll need to create impermeable boundaries on Facebook - i.e., don't friend your ex-students.

The choice is yours, GROOT, but given what you've written, we think the latter option suits you better right now. Revisit the question in a few years, when you're hopefully less stressed out about meeting guys and holding on to old friendships. By then, you may find that your colors have changed. :) HD

Once Upon a Princess

A Japanese folk tale is translated into an animated stunner from Studio Ghibli

Stunningly beautiful, the latest animated film from Japan's Studio Ghibli is a real work of art. The hand-drawn film by Isao Takahata (Grave of the Fireflies, My Neighbors the Yamadas), the legendary studio's cofounder with Hayao Miyazaki (Spirited Away), is based on a well-known 10th century Japanese folk story, "The Tale of the Bamboo Cutter." This folk tale about a magical child has even been cited by some scholars as an early and elegant work of science fiction. However, it's also possible to bypass all this baggage and just approach The Tale of Princess Kaguya as the gorgeous and expressive film that it is.

Using minimal lines and a visual style and coloring modeled after Japanese watercolors, the film reaches its greatest glory when capturing motion. The motions appear

lifelike and emotionally charged, and the pastels present a stark contrast to the harder look we associate with the majority of modern anime. Almost any frame of the movie can be excised and placed on a wall for continual viewing pleasure: It's that

The story opens as an aging bamboo cutter discovers a miniature princess in glowing bamboo stalk and, cupping the strange creature in his hands, brings her home to his wife, whereupon the tiny figure morphs into a human baby they call Kaguya. From there, the infant grows in rapid, unearthly spurts, while playing with her friends (who call her "L'il Bamboo") and remaining the apple of her adopted parents' eyes. When the bamboo cutter later finds gold coins and exquisite cloths in the base of another bamboo shoot, it's little wonder that he takes it as a sign he should move the family to the city and raise little Kaguya as a princess. At first resistant, the spritely young woman eventually kowtows to her lessons in restrictive womanhood, and multiple suitors come courting. Eventually, Kaguya discovers what she was meant to do with her life, even though it takes her away from the people she loves.

The Tale of Princess Kaguya is screening in a kid-friendly dubbed version during the daytime and the subtitled original in the evenings. Although I've only seen the subtitled version, I can recommend the film's suitability for young viewers, but do note that its themes and uncompromising ending render it a hard PG. It's a little too complex for the littler tots, and even the older ones might get a bit squirmy due to the two-hour-plus run time,

> but girls, especially, should be receptive to the story's fairy-tale qualities in which a child grows to young womanhood while discovering the reasons why she rejects

all her suitors and has always had a nagging sense of not belonging to her surroundings. Princess Kaguya belongs in the film-princess pantheon.

♦ ABCS OF DEATH 2 D: Various. (NR, 125 min.)

As was the case with V/H/S/2, the brains behind ABCs of Death 2 (RIP the "The") seem to have heeded criticisms lobbed against last year's predecessor – a horror anthology defined solely by assigned letters of the English alphabet and any manner of gruesomeness its participants could concoct to match - as this follow-up stands as a marked improvement.

Producers Tim League and Ant Timpson have united another 26 filmmakers and filmmaking teams to contribute a segment each, and the average quality is better overall, with fewer outright duds and less repetition among them, though the standouts might not quite rival the highlights of ABCs 1. Among the best of this volume: a hitman farce from Cheap Thrills director E.L. Katz, a hilarious courtroom drama involving the survivor of a zombie apocalypse, Todd Rohal's bizarrely cartoonish nightmare populated by a few familiar local faces, the latest Israel/Palestine parable from

Big Bad Wolves helmers Aharon Keshales and Navot Papushado, and a wicked subversion of juvenile wish-fulfillment from the Astron-6 crew.

The generally tongue-in-cheek tone is bookended by a fittingly violent storybook motif, and whenever the film does hit a speed bump (a shipwrecked bromance barely belongs; a Nigerian contribution feels more noble in its inclusion than necessary), viewers can take comfort in knowing they're but a few minutes from the next promising portion. Better yet, ABCs 2 makes the wise move to end on the most inventively perverse of all segments, Chris Nash's "Z is for Zygote."

A more esoteric fellow than myself might suggest there's something to be said for a catalog of anxieties so timeless and globally unifying that they collectively speak to the human condition in a multitude of tongues and tones. Let's not kid ourselves, though: This is basically a Whitman's Sampler of poor taste, and a tastier one at that.

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Mess With the Genres, You'll Get the Horns

Alexandre Aja discusses his film adaptation of Joe Hill's novel

Joe Hill's 2010 novel *Horns* is a prime example of the "new weird" strain in American genre fiction, part whimsical meditation on the judgmental devil inside us all, part grisly wish-fulfillment fantasy, and part hell-blasted, dark fantasy romance for a pessimistic, postmillennial readership. It is also a damnably unlikely novel for bigscreen adaptation, but Alexandre Aja, one of the leading purveyors of the so-called New Wave in French horror - his breakout film *High Tension* remains a gutsy shocker 11 years on – has done both book and its author proud with a feature version that mixes outright horror, gallows humor, and doomed romance into one of the most original films of any genre this year.

It certainly doesn't hurt things that Aja's film stars former teen

rank and lascivious innermost thoughts of the locals in his small town. It's a - you'll pardon the pun - helluva performance from Radcliffe and a terrifically original film in its own right. Finally, a Halloween horror show that isn't either a seguel or a retread. The Chronicle spoke to Aja at the film's Texas premiere at Fantastic Fest 2014 about the book, Joe Hill's involvement with the film adaptation, and the importance of getting those horns *just right*.

The Austin Chronicle: What's the backstory on you landing this project? Were you

already familiar with Joe Hill's work?

Alexandre Aja: I was in post-production on Piranha in Toronto and my agent sent me the galley of the book. I read it and from the first chapter I knew I had to find a way to make it happen. I contacted Joe Hill and found out that the book was already optioned by producer Cathy Schulman at Mandalay, with Shia LaBeouf attached. There was no script yet, but apparently things didn't go the way they thought they were going to go, and so a few weeks later

Cathy contacted me to say Shia LaBeouf was gone and I was in as director.

AC: Playwright Keith Bunin is credited with the script, but I was wondering how much input, if any, Joe Hill had going in? As the son of Stephen King, you'd figure he might be a little gun-shy about having his work adapted by someone else.

AA: Joe was very involved. It was the first time of one of his books was going to be turned into a film and I couldn't imagine making this movie without him. I knew that sometimes a writer can have a hard time with an adaptation of his work, but from the beginning Joe was here and he knew that I was defending his work and trying to make sure that it didn't become just another horror movie, or just a dark comedy, or lose all the flashbacks, you know? I wanted to embrace every element that makes the book such a unique and cult novel.

AC: How did Daniel Radcliffe become involved? He brings a very gritty, down-toearth vibe to a character and story that are anuthing but.

AA: Watching the movie now I can't imagine anyone else playing the character, but to be fully honest I was not even thinking of him to begin with. I knew that we had to find someone who was going to be the link between all the genres within the movie, kind of like James Stewart was in It's a Wonderful Life. The film needed someone who could make a fable like that but, you know, with all this darkness and demonic things.

The book was a huge success when it was published and Daniel had read it. He came to us and said, basically, "I want to play the role of Iggy, please meet with me." That was right before he did The Woman in Black. We met with him and of course it was strange for me, because, you know, he was still Harry Potter in my mind. It was only during the reading that I realized he was so much more than that. He read the part as exactly the character that I had imagined when I first read the book. He had the deep, dark romantic commitment, he was funny, he really embodied the character. I talked with Joe Hill about [Radcliffe's possible involvement in the production], and he said, "Yes, it's obvious, he's the only one who can do this." I mean, who else can be Ig Perrish, who else can be the face of this generation and the entry point into this fable for the audience? I think the audience will realize that Harry Potter was the beginning of something [for Radcliffe] and Horns is the beginning of something else, a new chapter in his career.

AC: It's hardly your typical horror-genre role. AA: Right. There were three big challenges to the movie. There was the challenge of keeping all the different genres straight and managing to have a story that doesn't feel like we are changing channels on the TV all the time. Another challenge was the time frame, because of all the flashbacks. The third challenge was the horns themselves, because as they were described in the book they were much more like Halloween props, pointy and red. Because I had the chance to grow up in a European city where there were all sorts of representations of God, angels, and devils literally on every street corner, all of them from the first part of the 19th century, I thought it would be better if we used a kind of Gustave Doré representation, which would also be much more romantic. So we used Greg Nicotero and his team from KNB EFX, and they created these wonderful horns that you kind of forget about. For me, it was so important to make the horns not a distraction from the story.

AC: Horns is tonally unlike anything you've had a hand in before. Do you consider this to be a new direction for you? A departure of sorts? AA: Before this, I made three films here in the U.S. that all had sequels that I was not involved in: The Hills Have Eyes, Mirrors, and Piranha, and so I feel that Horns is the most personal movie that I've made so far. In some ways it has kind of thrown me back to my first feature film, which no one has seen. Furia, the film I made before High Tension. With Horns, I feel as if I was going back to that time, to my 20s, returning to that dark, romantic side of myself as a filmmaker.

Horns opens Friday, Oct. 31, at the Alamo Drafthouse Village and is also available on VOD.

HORNS

D: Alexandre Aja; with Daniel Radcliffe, Juno Temple, Max Minghella, Heather Graham, Kathleen Quinlan, Joe Anderson, David Morse, James Remar. (R, 120 min.)

Horns is a spiky fable about the devil in all of us. Wrongly accused of killing his childhood sweetheart, twentysomething Iggy (a game Radcliffe) has hit rock-bottom, wracked by an internalized guilt compounded by the Gone Girl media frenzy surrounding the grisly crime. One morning following a night with Jack Daniels and a promiscuous barkeep, he awakes to find horned protuberances sprouting from his forehead, a metaphorical manifestation of how others perceive this fallen angel. His provocative appearance has a startling effect upon anyone with whom he comes in contact: It elicits the person's inner demons (or dark desires, depending how you look at it) like a wacky truth serum. The Valium-medicated mother of a screaming toddler in a doctor's office reception area confides her wish to abandon her family and screw her golf pro; the receptionist angrily berates the mother for her lack of parenting skills; the bratty child expresses thoughts of matricide. Even Iggy's parents condition their seemingly unconditional love for their prodigal son in no uncertain terms. It's no wonder: The poor guy looks like hell.

The movie works best as a whodunit with a pointed twist. Upon realizing the only way to remedy his PR problem is to solve his girlfriend's murder, Iggy zooms around his sleepy Washington town in a red-hot Gremlin, working on a mystery without any clues until his strange new power unfolds the events of the fateful night upon which she died. (Actually, a big reveal occurs early in the film, if you think about it.) But once the killer's identity is revealed, this allegory about the perils of perception unwisely enters a fourth act. becoming a horror-tinged fantasy in which the script's symbolic conceit turns literal. The tightrope between the real and the unreal is a delicate one to walk, and one wrong move can be unforgiving. That's the dilemma of Horns.

As the bedeviled Iggy, Radcliffe strives admirably, with mixed results. A performer of greater stature might have played the part more effectively, particularly the film's darker scenes. (Physically, Radcliffe is more Pan than Mephistopheles.) No doubt the young actor is working hard to shake his Harry Potter image here: He smokes, drinks, swears, pisses, and fucks his way through this movie, often in a state of half-undress. It's the conundrum many a child star has faced in adulthood, from Mickey to Judy to

Elizabeth to Kurt to Drew to Elijah - how to grow up onscreen without alienating your audience. For Radcliffe in Horns, it's a case of damned if you do, damned if you don't.

NIGHTCRAWLER

D: Dan Gilroy; with Jake Gyllenhaal, Rene Russo, Riz Ahmed, Bill Paxton, Michael Hyatt. (R, 117 min.)

"I'm a little lost," Lou Bloom (Jake Gyllenhaal) admits to the security guard who's spotted him stealing chain-link fence. A petty thief unable to land a real job, Lou's gaunt appearance makes his perpetual grin appear all the less trustworthy, his overly rehearsed rhetoric only ringing more hollow with each passing encounter. However, in due time, Lou is drawn like a moth to the very real flame of a car wreck on the L.A. interstate, not helping the paramedics or police, but rather observing the parasitic cameramen out to get juicy footage for local news stations to air.

From that moment on, Lou is gifted with glorious purpose, set on finding himself a camera and a police scanner, then a news producer Nina (Russo) interested in buying his better clips, then an intern Rick (Ahmed, delivering a wonderfully wary supporting turn) who's eager to work the GPS and watch the car once at the crime scene. Lou doesn't seem to sleep, getting the goods at night and staying up to capture their subsequent broadcast. Furthermore, Lou doesn't seem to care about anything or anyone else, not if it means getting the best of angles on the worst of situations.

Dan Gilrov is a veteran scribe now making a splash similar to the one his brother Tony had with his directorial debut Michael Clayton. Nightcrawler may not have much more to say about the bloodthirsty media realm than what was skewered in Network in 1976 (such persistent relevance is damning in its own right), but that satire is secondary to Lou's tenacious, self-delusional rise through the ranks. We're given no tragic backstory for our antihero, and Gyllenhaal's terrifically fierce performance leaves us with no need to wonder. The evident byproduct of self-actualization seminars and good old-fashioned amorality, Lou epitomizes all-American ambition left to curdle in the media spotlight, the extent to which he is willing to endanger others coming to a head in a nerve-wracking finale.

Lou's wrong-headed convictions lead to a pair of show-stopping monologues amid



countless uncomfortable exchanges between him and his direct competition Joe (Paxton), intern Rick, and producer Nina, who tests the boundaries of news ethics as much as Lou does without leaving the comfort of her control room. Much as Robert Elswit's sharp cinematography captures the concurrent danger and appeal of after-hours Los Angeles, James Newton Howard's score wavers brilliantly between serving as ominous accompaniment to Lou's nocturnal scavenging and providing a counterposing sense of uplift worthy of his deranged aspirations.

Yet Gilroy and Gyllenhaal prey expertly on the same inability to look away that Lou and Nina specialize in exploiting, conveying uncomfortable lengths and plumbing unspeakable depths with a shared determination. Releasing Nightcrawler on Halloween may seem counterintuitive, but then again. when better to release a thoroughly gripping portrait of an utterly modern sociopath?

OUIJA

D: Stiles White; with Olivia Cooke, Ana Cato, Daren Kagasoff, Douglas Smith, Bianca Santos, Shelley Hennig, Lin Shaye, Vivis. (PG-13, 89 min.)

Hasbro's long-lasting occult board game gets its own starring role in a film that makes those other recent Hasbro plaything adaptations - namely Transformers and G.I. Joe – look like triumphs of subtly engineered cinematic magic. Too bad then that there's very little magic - black, white, or whatever in this watery mediocrity that packs as much spook-show punch as Charlie Brown's holeriddled Halloween costume.

After the mysterious (but inventive, with Christmas lights!) suicide of her BFF Debbie (Hennig), teen smart girl Laine (Cooke), along with boyfriend Trevor (Kagasoff), sister Sarah (Coto), and pals Pete (Smith) and Isabelle (Santos), naturally spy the dead girl's Ouija board and attempt to uncover the riddle of her untimely demise. As presumably everyone in the world (except the film's protagonists and victims) already knows, Ouija boards aren't to be used as toys, and using them by yourself, alone, in the dark, is a surefire way to accidentally summon soul-sucking entities from the lands beyond. Happily, there turns out to be a spare Ouija board with a functional planchette (the little cotton feet on my own board disintegrated decades ago) in Debbie's spooky old attic. Before you can spell "goodbye," the teens have opened themselves up to the same evil force that claimed their friend's life. The only question worth venturing quickly becomes: Who will die next, and why should we care? Magic 8 Ball says, "Ask again later."

Ouija marks director White's feature debut and if it's a portent of things to come, it's an ill omen indeed. There's nary a chill or shock cut in the film that isn't grafted from some

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other relatively recent fright flick, and while the cast is uniformly game for the barelythere storyline, they're also as generically high school as you might imagine. The only genuine eeriness in the film is generated by Insidious's Shave as a demented but still corporeal relative to one of the spirits contacted via the troublesome board. That's not saving a lot, I realize, but in a film this rote and tedious, it's the only highlight to be found.

WHIPLASH

D: Damien Chazelle; with Miles Teller, J.K. Simmons, Melissa Benoist, Paul Reiser, Austin Stowell, Nate Lang. (R, 107 min.)

If recent release Birdman borrowed a cup of energy from its drum score, then Whiplash. about a young jazz drummer at a cutthroatcompetitive conservatory, steals a whole quart. I'm not sure the movie would work if it was about a soprano sax player tootling mellow: the story's too thin, and it requires all that pounding of the skins to give it muscle.

Socially maladroit and painfully singleminded, freshman Andrew (Teller) lives only to drum - not out of pleasure, necessarily, but in order to be anointed the next Buddy Rich. Early on, he's tapped by an instructor named Fletcher (Simmons) to join his elite competition band. Fletcher is a legendary monster, but he knows how to seduce this dewy-eved hopeful. He makes nice with Andrew - asks about his family, props him up with talk of nascent genius and tales of Bird's first hops only to use that information to sweep the leg. so to speak, to publicly humiliate his plebe drummer, ostensibly to goad him to be better.

Andrew does get better – he gets great. actually – and he wears his bloodied paws like a badge of honor, even as he shudders when his alpha barks. The band at large is only glanced at, but writer/director Damien Chazelle (Guy and Madeline on a Park Bench) cannily conveys the cycle of abuse. Fletcher's ensemble, cowed, hardly makes eye contact with their conductor. Still, they're quick to mimic his top-down brutality: The alpha rears a new pack to bare sharp teeth.

Ultimately, Chazelle isn't interested in the long lens. He's tightly fixated on master and supplicant, each with his own agenda, and the film is essentially one long cockfight. After his debut as a shattered penitent in Rabbit Hole. Teller has made a career out of being the snarkiest guy in the room. It's startling, and maybe a setback, to see him playing such a dope here. Andrew is a youngling – the clay hasn't met the kiln – and for all his sweat-splayed aerobics, he's not all that interesting to watch; how do you make inroads on a kid who's running in place? The starkly bald and fracture-lined Simmons has a face you might chisel into rock, and he's endlessly fascinating in motion, too. But again, does Chazelle really have anything unique to say about this raging megalomaniac? The leads' prolonged, puffed-feathers sparring is entertaining while it lasts, but the sensation of something sizable is only fleeting.

ANNABELLE

Effectively a prequel to James Wan's above-average 2013 freakout The Conjuring, Annabelle provides an origin story for the tiny titular terror, set against the backdrop of Charles Manson's summer of blood. After doctor John Gordon (Horton) surprises his doll-collecting spouse Mia (Wallis) with the as-yet-uncursed doll, the believably bland Californian couple endures a home invasion by creepy-crawling "cult" members, and Mia urges John to toss the bloodied Annabelle out with the trash, which he does. Predictably, though, she turns up in the bottom of a moving box after the pair relocates to Pasadena, just as ominous - and equally foreseeable - events begin plaguing Mia. Considering the film's formulaic, low-rent proceedings offer genre fans nothing whatsoever that hasn't been done before, and done better, you might find yourself quoting Rosemary's Baby: "This is no dream, this is really happening." But this film is in fact the worst yet. As high school sweethearts in the early Nineties, rich but kind Amanda (Liberato) and poor but noble Dawson (Bracey) try to keep the wolves at bay, including her disapproving pop and his cartoon-evil dad. We know something will tear them apart, because as grownups they've become, respectively, a sweater-set mom (Monaghan) and a lonely oil rig worker (Marsden) who still pines for Amanda. But it's limp suspense, and the romance is no better. Michael Keaton plays Riggan Thomas, who once ruled Hollywood as the star of a superhero franchise - he was the titular Birdman - but whose career has since crumbled. Birdman opens just days before Riggan debuts his stage adaptation of Raymond Carver's "What We Talk About When We Talk About Love" - and he's cracking from the stress. The play is in shambles, Riggan's Broadway big-shot co-star (Norton) is stealing his limelight, and Riggan may or may not be going nuts. Birdman moves at a relentless tempo, somewhere between nervous-leg agitation and hair-pulling hysteria. 

As tank commander Sgt. Don Collier, Pitt is both his crew's literal and figurative "Wardaddy" and the moral compass of the film. "This is war, there is no right or wrong," he hollers at milquetoast replacement gunner Norman (Lerman), an army typist suddenly thrust into the maw of hell. The film's unfailingly realistic setpieces, while often pulse-poundingly well-shot, too often fail to connect emotionally. Fury's worth seeing on a big screen - if only to wallow in the sprawling sound design and muddy, bloody, tank-on-tank melees - but it's too strangely hidebound by overused dramatic tropes to inflict serious damage. Then Nick returns home on their fifth anniversary to find Amy missing. Enter detective Boney (Dickens) and her sidekick cop Jim Gilpin (Fugit), who quickly establish that there's been a whole lot of crimson spilled in the kitchen, and suddenly Nick is Suspect No. 1. The young men, in Kansas City, Mo., meet Witherspoon's Carrie, an employment officer who begrudgingly takes on their case and, eventually, their cause to reunite with Abital. Even if Canadian director Philippe Falardeau's film becomes more generic with the addition of bona fide movie stars and slicker dialogue and plotting, the finely calibrated performances of the three leading men pull The Good Lie through to its moving conclusion. KILL THE MESSENGER

Already a Pulitzer Prize-winner, Webb scooped every major media outlet in 1996 by discovering, via dogged, shoe-leather reportage, that the CIA had helped the U.S.-backed Nicaraguan Contras smuggle tons of cocaine into America during the Reagan era. His muckraking idealism lead him to dig deeper and push harder, which results in unforeseen consequences for himself and his family. I'll skip the spoilers, but given the current zeitgeist, audiences are unlikely to be shocked by the film's portrayal of viciousness in the U.S. government and mainstream media. Cuesta's film is a worthy effort, and Webb's story is important. Nevertheless, Kill the Messenger feels extremely dated: In these cynical times, it's too little, too late, which is too bad. THE MAZE RUNNER

None of the designated Runners has managed to find a way out in three years of exploration, nor have any of them survived a night spent among the hiomechanical beasts called Grievers. There's no need to read James Dashner's source novel in order to deduce that Thomas will be The One Who Changes Everything. Even if it doesn't prove to be the Hunger Games-level hit its producers clearly desired, The Maze Runner's intertwining tensions of schoolyard bluster, dwindling supplies, and what's beyond those walls make it the best of the wannabes we've seen so far. THE OVERNIGHTERS

A social-justice documentary that packs a visceral emotional wallop to the heart and mind, The Overnighters could scarcely be more relevant to our stressy, fearful present. Moss trains his one-man film crew on a tiny patch of combustible Americana, namely the economically bedeviled town of Williston, N.D., which is seeing a huge - and unwanted - increase in population thanks to the regional boom in oil fracking. Moss finds his film's focus by centering on avuncular Lutheran pastor Jay Reinke, a family man who (refreshingly) takes the Christian mandate to care for one's fellow man by turning his small church into a blessed sort of bed-and-breakfast shelter for the

flood of "overnighters." This doc is downright laudable. A third-act revelation will knock viewers silly and cause them to reevaluate everything that's come before, but even without that jaw-dropper, Moss' film is a righteous piece of empathetic, of-the-moment documentary filmmaking. THE SKELETON TWINS

There's not a lot that screams "original" in this second feature from Craig Johnson (True Adolescents), but it's worth a watch to see reliably comic actors Bill Hader and Kristen Wiig do some heavy dramatic lifting. The Skeleton Twins introduces the pair as long-estranged siblings who reunite when Milo (Hader) attempts suicide. So, sister Maggie (Wiig) takes him back to their small hometown in New York where she lives with nice-guy hubby Lance (Wilson). Everyone assumes Milo is the basket case, but Maggie's got her secrets, too. For a movie with mental health on its mind, The Skeleton Twins feels oddly lowstakes; suicide, a recurring concern, never feels like more than a plot device, something overworkshopped at a Sundance Lab. There are no glaring missteps, but little breath of life, either. Beautifully shot and sensitively performed, the film is sometimes funny, sometimes sweet, sometimes sad - and always expected. ST. VINCENT

Although playing the unabashed curmudgeon next door is the kind of thing Bill Murray could do in his sleep, this treasured actor instead brings everything he has to the role of Vincent MacKenna. In fact, all the actors in writer/ director Theodore Melfi's feature debut are at their best, and manage to keep this crowd-pleasing comedy buoyant, even as it sails through sappy waters. The story kicks into gear when new neighbors, Maggie (McCarthy) and her son Oliver (Lieberher), move into the house next door to Vincent in Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn. A newly single mom, Maggie works late hours, and the grouch next door quickly becomes Oliver's after-school babysitter. If you scratch the surface too deeply, a few things might not ring true, but there's no greater pleasure to be had than St. Vincent's opening and closing sequences during which Murray dances and sings along to the music coming through his headphones. Screenwriter Jonathan Tropper adapts his comic novel about an estranged family forced to reconnect when they sit shiva for their late father. Jane Fonda plays the matriarch, a self-help-book author who mined her children for material, to their everlasting resentment. Jason Bateman is straightand-narrow middle son Judd, whose career and marriage have hit a roadblock, while his siblings (Stoll, Fey, and Driver) all struggle with their own disappointments. Subtle it ain't, but there's an undercurrent of palpable rage that pokes through the (very funny) banter-banter gloss of the thing, and the actors rip into it with relish. Based on the true story of Travis Freeman, a high school football player from Corbin, Ky., who was struck blind by a severe sinus infection – yet still continued to play – this directorial debut from actor Dylan Baker is a well-acted inspirational sports drama that never quite rises above the treacly mire of cliches so seemingly inherent to the genre. A generic triumph-over-adversity film, 23 Blast gets its title from the name of a football play, one learned early on by Travis (Hapka) and his best friend Jerry (Hoover). When Travis, a wide receiver, goes blind and understandably shuts down, Jerry is there to help as he acclimates to his new condition. 23 Blast's heart might be in the right place, but everything else seems a mishmash of tropes hearkening back to the Hallmark movies era. If you're needing a small-town football fix, cue up Friday Night Lights instead. (10/24/2014)

A WALK AMONG THE TOMBSTONES

When his next case turns up, involving a pair of psychopathic ex-DEA agents (Harbour and Thompson) who get their jollies chopping up drug traffickers' girlfriends, wives, and daughters, we learn that tracking serial killers is a lot tougher without an iPhone or a working knowledge of the internet: The film is set in 1999. With A Walk Among the Tombstones, the names have been changed but the story's all too familiar, It's less homage than a cliched retread of the tried and true. The problem - and this goes back to teamwork - is that the film barely individuates its characters. Let's be honest: One guy already definitively nailed the holy trinity of God/family/football, and his name is Kyle Chandler, It's an impossible standard, maybe, but in 42 minutes, TV's Friday Night Lights delivered all-star-level emotional complexity and action. 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



Fan Fest Upgrades

International racing fans are pulling into Austin for the third annual Formula One weekend, and with it comes a three-day, four-stage musical block party known as Austin Fan Fest. The free Downtown event, counterpoint to pricey Circuit of the Americas branded gigs by Kid Rock and Duran Duran, has been hit or miss in its first two iterations, putting on well-selected performers of local and national

provenance amongst a swath of casino circuit hasbeens like last year's headliners of Berlin, Foreigner's **Lou Gramm**, and **Everlast**.

This weekend's Fan Fest retreads its track record with a schedule promising excellent national acts including De La Soul, Joan Jett & the Blackhearts,

Fishbone, and the Whigs; Halloween appropriate tributes to **Tom Petty**. **David Bowie**. the Smiths, and Selena; and a deep selection of credible locals including Black Joe Lewis, Conjunto Los Pinkys, Minor Mishap Marching Band, the Texas Tornados, and Whiskey Shivers (see

"Music Listings," p.96). That latter act, liquored-up barefoot folk musicians who ply a style called thrashgrass, are a bona fide Austin live staple and one soundtracking Fan Fest has gotten right all three years.

"The people who organize Fan Fest have been really good to us and they pay really well." acknowledged upright bassist Andrew Van Voorhees. "Finding well-paying gigs in

Austin is really hard. If you have to have a sponsor behind you so the band can pay its rent for the month, I think that's all right."

Indeed, three current and past Fan Fest artists tell "Playback" it pays exceptionally well, one citing a four-digit wage. The general increase of relevance

and taste can be attributed to a new booking team. Circuit of the Americas switched from an outside promoter to a partnership that involves Transmission Events and ACL Live at the Moody Theater.

"They both have proven track records in bringing top notable talent to town and also



understanding this city's musical taste," says former ACL Live Marking Director **Sharilyn** Mayhugh, who left the venue to work with COTA in May and initiated the current partnership. "Having worked with both companies in the past provided an existing trust factor."

Asked how he approached putting together a musical roster, Transmission's head booker **Graham Williams** said it was about finding what F1 wants for its fans.

"Some elements of the last two Fan Fests had an odd mix that didn't really reflect Austin as well as it could have," emailed Williams. "It's about being aware that COTA is now a big part of the Austin community, but also bringing a lot of new people into town for the weekend. We all want to find

that balance between having an event that appeals to locals and people that are just in town for the weekend.

"We think you can be diverse in your lineup without having a bill of bands with zero crossover."

ACL Live and Belmont booker Jack McFadden, who was instrumental in assembling Fan Fest's 2014 lineup, agrees.

"We were putting together something, regardless of F1, that would really represent the spirit of a free Downtown music festival." he says. "We kept landing on bands that were celebratory, nothing too dark or quiet. It was fun to be able to do that for the city of Austin and have it still appeal to the influx of F1 fans coming from all around the word."

HOUSECORE HORROR FEST FOUNDER DIES

In the aftermath of last weekend's Housecore Horror Film Festival, co-founder Corey Mitchell, 47, died in the parking lot of **Emo's** on Monday, presumably from a heart attack.

"He seemed to be feeling fine just before it happened," said **U.S. Army** member **Michael** Paul Rodriguez, who flew in from Hawaii to volunteer for the festivities. The afternoon after the second annual convergence had ended, at 1:30pm, Rodriguez helped Mitchell load production gear into his van when he heard a thud. "I turned around and he had gone down. Myself and several others ran to the van and could see he was unconscious. He was convulsing, exhaling heavily, and turning blue. The paramedics showed up very quickly and used a defibrillator. At first they couldn't find a pulse, then they could. It was going in and out.

"Then they drove him away and one of his friends went with, but when I looked at his face, I could tell he wasn't going to come back from that."

"We're really just still in shock," Mitchell's friend and business partner Phil Anselmo told the Chronicle that evening. "It's all just horrifically surreal. This one hurts, man. They all do, but this has a special kind of hurt to it. The event was such a blast, such a success, and everybody had such a great time. Nobody worked as hard as Corey. He

believed in it so fucking much. He fought for it every inch of the way. It's like lightning striking, man, you just never know."

Mitchell, who lived in Schertz with his wife and two young daughters, was a nationally respected writer who authored bestselling true crime books and the "Bleeders' Digest" column for MetalSucks.net. He was also a longtime fan and supporter of heavy, underground bands from Austin.

The festival's second year delivered to fans exactly what they came for: classic horror films, in-depth panels, and world class live metal. It wasn't without growing pains, however. It was a surprise to fans that they added a large parking lot stage at Midway Field House on the same block as Emo's and perhaps a greater surprise to the surrounding community, which made dozens of noise complaints to the venue. There were also technical issues like fans not being able to pay on-site with credit cards. Stress no doubt played a role in Mitchell's death.

"Putting on Housecore is an unbelievable undertaking," said former HHFF creative director **Tammy Moore**. "Every part that seems to be in place has a thousand little parts going along with it. Corey had never put on a concert this size and we had to create the model as we went along, which made it

very stressful. I was surprised both of us lived through it the first year."

Mitchell and Moore parted ways as business partners on HHFF 2.

"There were some serious financial issues - big numbers needed to be accounted for and Corey and I seriously disagreed on how to deal with those things," continues Moore. "His passion was so strong that he was willing to get loans to pay for it to make sure

everyone involved was financially taken care of. Even though I didn't agree with his methods, I admired the way he put himself out there. It showed me how much this thing meant for him "

With this loss, Housecore Horror hangs in the balance. Whether we've seen the last of this Texas metal/film combo will be sorted out in the by-and-by. Now isn't the time for restructuring, of course. It's time to mourn.

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Heaven **Tonight**

Flesh Lights balance melody and power

Think back to 2011.

Sometime between Arizona congresswoman Gabrielle Giffords getting shot at a supermarket and the Pentagon's repeal of "don't ask, don't tell," Austin's Twistworthy Records issued a piece of vinyl. Housed in a deliberately ugly white sleeve, it resembled some clandestine bootleg. Depicted: a drum head atop which sit three Polaroids of grinning young faces - and a scrawl of Magic Marker capitals: "FLESH LIGHTS MUSCLE POP."

Needle to groove ... Armageddon. Twelve high-speed, trash-compactor odes to being drunk, horny, and livin' badly. Here, the difference between one and two minutes might as well be millennia.

"We had to play faster on the first one so [producer] Mike [Vasquez] wouldn't stop the tape," laughs bassist Jeremy Steen about the 2010 sessions at Sweatbox Studio. "He thought we were gonna do two songs, and before he knew it, we'd done six!"

In 28 minutes, Austin birthed an heir to New York's Devil Dogs, cranked up Nineties inheritors of the Dictators' scuzz-punk crown, and -

"I actually don't know that band well at all," injects singer/guitarist Max Vandever.

"I'm really not that into them," agrees Steen.

"I have one record by them," allows drummer Elissa Ussery. Would you settle for the Angry Samoans?!

Most bands never cut a Muscle Pop, as fully realized a debut as any in punk. Beneath the distortion and propulsion, cousins Vandever and Ussery plus Steen play circles around their peers. Vandever's songwriting talent demands constant monitoring, while Steen's three tunes - "Allyson," "Mr. Resistible," and "Novel" - make him the threesome's John Entwistle: first-rate tunesmith in a group starring a great one.

"I'm a huge fan of Jeremy's songs," says Vandever. "I never know the lyrics until we record them, so I'm always blown away when I hear his finished product."

Flesh Lights, named after a locally produced sex toy. then did as any good band should. They packed Beerland on a regular basis, toured, and started stamping out singles. After their bow, two 45s and a double 7-inch EP added up to another LP-and-a-half's worth of material.

Then one day, Vandever awoke to a crazed text from Hotel Vegas kingpin Ben Tipton.

"He was in all caps: 'YOU GUYS ARE GONNA BE ON TOUR WITH THE HIVES! IT'S GONNA BE AWESOME!"

Eric Davidson, onetime New Bomb Turk turned journal-

ist, was asked by Sweden's garage-punk glory boys for a list of his favorite American bands. They needed opening acts. The Flesh Lights stood out. Vandever concedes the ensuing shows together might have brought the Austin trio new fans, but he mostly remembers the initial experience for a bad review: "One guy said we were a punk band fronted by a prep in 'Kings of Leon-esque shoes."

Before the glory, there was apprenticeship. Ussery, the older of the two San Antonio émigrés, discovered classic punk rock through her father's and older sister's record collections at age 12. A Mojo magazine listing 100 vintage punk 45s cinched her interest, so she passed it on to Vandever. The two had already banded together - she on drums, he on keyboards - for the family gathering circuit, and even boasted original tunes. Ussery has their first collaboration, "Snow Day," on her iPod.

Meanwhile Steen was just up the highway with his first band, the Beginners. The Austin native recalls his older brother taking him to his first show, a hardcore bill at local coffeehouse Another Cup, when he was 9. In 2009, that same sibling brought Vandever to see Steen's then-band the Gospel Truth. Vandever and Ussery had been looking for a bassist.

Five blistering years later, Flesh Lights' second fulllength finally issues next week. Credit Gerard Cosloy's

12XU Records for Free Yourself, bearing Vandever's interest in Cheap Trick's own muscle pop. "Just About Due" and re-recorded summer single "No Longer" offer the same perfect balance of melody and power chords found on 1978's "Surrender" sponsor Heaven Tonight.

Steen cuts such as "Mandarin" apply darker, artier twists to the familiar bash-n-crash, while Ussery's "German Discs" most resembles the old thrashing - and it's about Nazis developing flying saucers.

"I wish you could record my book collection on World War II history," she muses over a Guinness.

Steen says Cosloy's involvement helped fast-track the release. His mixing suggestions were crucial, adds Vandever. For her part, Ussery simply plays like she's been transformed into Keith Moon.

If the long-awaited follow-up to Muscle Pop wasn't enough, there's Vandever's newfound fatherhood. His fiancée Leah Neiheisel gave birth at 28 weeks to the couple's first child, so their daughter remains in a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit until her original due date, Dec. 6. Caroline's early arrival will curtail touring at present.

"I think two days after we had Caroline, Leah asked, 'So, when are you going on tour again?" recounts Vandever. "I was like, 'Babe, don't worry about it. We're not gonna do that.' And she's like, 'No, you have to!""

"That's the reason why I wasn't like, 'Fuck! Max is having a baby - bye to everything!" nods Ussery. "He's not in a situation where the girl is like, 'I've got you! You're trapped!"

"She's the most supportive person ever," says Vandever.

"Except when we ask what she thinks of the songs," cracks Steen. "Then she's the most critical person ever!"

The three will channel their productivity toward the next song or next release while Vandever gets in some quality family time. They're nowhere near reaching Ussery's goal of full-time employment as a working band, or Steen's of becoming the next Black Keys. This much muscle growth, however, leaves everyone else time enough to bulk up alongside the Flesh Lights.

Flesh Lights appear in-store at End of an Ear at 6pm Monday. Nov. 3. Their release show is the following night at Hotel Vegas.



Time to amend all Flesh Lights-related documents and strike out the word "garage." That musical lexeme defies the precision and composition quality showcased on the local trio's second fling - a fast-rock treasure. Of course they're still mischievous punks named after a male masturbation enhancer. That remains on topical songs including Jeremy Steen's comically dramatic foretelling of Chinese world domination ("Mandarin") and drummer Elissa Ussery's breathless conspiracy on Nazi UFO's ("German Discs") - plus stabs at ATX's aging hipsters ("Middle Aged Youths") and failed rockers ("Big Break"). Developing as a punk band means growth without growing up and, on Free Yourself,

that stride begins with guitar glorification. Atop the seismic rhythms of Steen's impenetrable Rickenbacker raking and Ussery's hyperventilating beats, primary composer Max Vandever shoots squirrelly riffs into every available nook like a best-of-both-worlds amalgamation of Greg Ginn and Rick Nielsen. The guitarist, voice still sneering with youthful snot, generates peak power on the title track, either a suicide note or declaration of living life to its fullest. Free Yourself steps up Flesh Lights' game on all fronts: songwriting, musicianship, diversity, and muscle. They aren't the scene's scrappy grunts - never were. They're artistically elite.

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
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


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WHISKEY SHIVERS

Whiskey Shivers' third LP finds the ragged Austin bunch working with a producer for the first time: Robert Ellis, the Houston native whose gritty February release The Lights From the Chemical Plant made him an excitable name in country circles. Ellis helped knob that album and took full production responsibilities on his 2011 step-out Photographs plus self-released debut The Great Rearranger, but he hadn't yet taken charge of another band's album. On Whiskey Shivers, his prints are all over the 11 tracks, most visibly via "There Is a Time," on which Ellis also plays mandolin. Ultimately, he's helped the locals grow their own identifiable sound. Once somewhat of a calculated mess, the quintet - banjo, fiddle, upright bass, guitar, and washboard - here celebrates space, both lyrically via the Wild Child-like "Angel in the Snow" and musically. Check Jeff Hortillosa's guitar solo on "Friends" and the haunting percussion throughout "Graves." And despite the folkers' instrumental breakdowns, "Hot Party Dads" and "Swarm" (the latter a crisp remake off 2012's Rampa Head), Whiskey Shivers carries a truer songwriter vibe than the outfit's previous stomp-and-hollers. Excepting only "Time" from bluegrass legends the Dillards, the band combined to pen 10 of the album's 11 cuts, another step outside its comfort zone. The mastering could stand to be a little tighter - it doesn't sound like it was recorded at Houston's iconic SugarHill Studios - but if that's the lone growing pain, so be it. **** - Chase Hoffberger

CHURCHWOOD

3: Trickgnosis (Saustex)

Equally versed in progressive blues and smartass alt-rock. Churchwood remains a band Austin deserves. Poetry professor Joe Doerr channels his



wordplay through gravel-gargling magnificence. Based in but not bound by blues, guitarists Billysteve Korpi and Bill Anderson miscegenate riffs that could power the songs on their own, making terms like "lead" and "rhythm" meaningless. Adam Kahan and Julien Peterson bend with the rhythmic winds of their bandmates without ever uprooting the beat. Thus fortified, 3: Trickgnosis drags Americana through the alley and into the woods, bathing her afterward but leaving her dress dirty. The wild-eyed "Hanged Man," lowdown "Eminence Gris Gris," and murderous "I Spit You Out" bury the blues deep in the recesses of Chester Burnett's darkest imagination. "Drapetomaniac" gets drunk on the set of a spaghetti Western, while "Chemtrailer Trash" breaks into the nearest garage and desecrates the place. The falsetto weirdness of "Triptych" inhabits a hallucinogenic dimension floating through mushroom fantasies instead of booze nightmares. This third effort invades the parlor in a stylish suit and advanced state of dementia, spewing compelling tales and brilliant asides even as its breath could kill a rhino.

BLXPLTN Black Cop Down (Wolfshield Records)

The PC crowd's eyes might bug over the cover art of Blxpltn's debut fulllength, a Sambo-esque policeman igniting a



wooden cross, but such provocations are inherent to these righteous electro-punks' mission of waking you up to political oppression and racial inequality. The local outfit's nine-song clip of anti-authority anthems fires a kill shot with "Train (Get Out)," running jagged synth

blasts under percussionist Taszlin Muerte and bassist Jonathan Horstmann's accusations of microchip brain implants and spy drones before guitarist Khattie Q's crusty shriek ushers a brutal industrial breakdown. The trio's aggressive melee of drum pad beats, filtered bass, synth outbursts, and scuzz guitar tones comes craftily sewn by ...Trail of Dead's Autry Fulbright and Ringo Deathstarr's Elliott Frazier, who produced the album after initial tracking by recently deceased keyboardist wiz Ikey Owens. It's an impressive debut stocked with anger and outrage that boils over with world-on-my-back frustration on "Pressure" and police profiling callout "Stop & Frisk." Unity prevails on the best track, "Start Fires," when Horstmann sings "Set fires, stop fighting, you're a tiger, I'm a lion." Translation: Fight the man.

THE WELL Samsara (Riding Easy)

Psychedelic rock now suffers from bands that have never gotten within 10 feet of an altered state of mind or an



occult ritual. Not so the Well. Samsara, the Austin trio's first full-length, scans as conceived during astral travels and recorded on another plane. Point track "Mortal Bones" signs the contract immediately, rhythm roiling between dinosaur throb and spaceship charge, lyrics pondering otherworldly tales of being "Seated on a mountaintop/ Born of fire, living god," plutonium riffs pulling from that point in rock history before metal ever saw an arena stage. The dual vocals of axeman Ian Graham and bass queen Lisa Alley arrive via shortwave transmission from elsewhere, possibly Mars. The bluesy "Trespass," romping "1000 Lies," and thudding "I Bring the Light" similarly call down spirits, but the majestic strength of "Eternal Well" brings the Well's mystically cosmic vision to full-on chromatic life. It's also telling that featured cover "Lucifer Sam" comes not from the set list of some AOR warhorse, but from the fevered mind of Syd Barrett. Crank the amps and let's get metaphysical.



ERIC JOHNSON Europe Live (Mascot) **ERIC JOHNSON** AND MIKE **STERN** Eclectic (Heads Up)

Guitar star Eric Johnson traverses three decades' worth of catalog on concert retrospective Europe Live. Joined by stalwart accompa-

nists Chris Maresh and Wayne Salzmann II, the Austin native hits all the obvious signposts ("Zap," "Cliffs of Dover") and classics in training ("Zenland," "Austin"). Elsewhere, he resurrects the 30-year-old acoustic piece "Song for Life," successfully pulls off John Coltrane's "Mr. P.C." until Maresh and Salzmann highjack it, and once again demonstrates that he has no feel for blues (Alien Love Child's "Last House on the Block"). Newer tunes "Fatdaddy" and "Evinrude Fever" serve as excuses for Johnson's finger play, but Ah Via Musicom gem "Forty Mile Town" remains a perfect example of using technical virtuosity to create memorable melodies instead of wanking frameworks. Europe Live could use more moments like it, but it will thrill die-hards. Eclectic puts Johnson with jazz axe Mike Stern and lives up to its title. Frankly, some tunes are pretty dire. The world doesn't need another cover of Hendrix's "Red House," while Pat Metheny Group tribute "Wishing Well" (with vocals from Christopher Cross) would make Cookie Monster's stomach hurt. "Roll With It," co-starring Malford Milligan, should come in a white package stamped with a bar code and "blues rock." When jazz takes the lead for "Benny Man's Blues," "Tidal," and "Remember," putting Stern in his comfort zone and pushing Johnson out of his, Eclectic sets up the right framework to show both men at their improvisational best. Plus, Johnson reconnects with his Electromagnets roots on a rocking remake of "Dry Ice," and the pair gets spacey on "Big Foot." It's not enough to overcome cheese like "Sometimes" and "Hullabaloo," but they're proof a strong album struggles to come out. Europe Live ★★★

KAT EDMONSON

The Big Picture (Sony Music Masterworks)

After years of splitting time between the Big Apple and the live music capital, anachronistic chanteuse Kat Edmonson made the transition to full-time New Yorker. The move took her beyond the Austin wine bars and coffee shops where she paid her dues and landed TV ads with Coca-Cola and Zales. Now, the Houston native's third release and major label debut on Sony Music Masterworks, The Big Picture, employs lessons gleaned from the Great American Songbook while creating an aura unmistakably her own. Edmonson polished her vocal stylings on 2009 debut Take to the Sky through the work of the Cure, Henry Mancini, Cole Porter, and others. Songwriting on The Big Picture - 11 of 12 tracks bear her name - incor-



porates all, but plays out fresh and dewy. Sixties-leaning Mad Men ballad "Till We Start to Kiss," her jazz-touched soprano on the ebullient "Avion," and guitar-picked Miles Zuniga cover "You Can't Break My Heart" all fuse to the precise touch of Paul McCartney producer Mitchell Froom. Edmonson's voice swells and dips and weaves with effortless precision, arresting without belting. "Oh My Love" reverts to the down-tempo standards showcased on 2013's Way Down Low, the singer's nasally twinge relaxing into the

style of jazz greats. Vocal frills ornament her backing band on "The Best," where she teeters on playful scatting in infectious swing time. The Big Picture tours us through bygone eras reinterpreted by a newly metropolitan outlook. Still, the steel guitars on "Crying" make you wonder if she doesn't miss Texas, if only a little bit. ★★★



MARCIA BALL

The Tattooed Lady and the Alligator Man (Alligator)

After 44 years of singing Bayou blues, Marcia Ball proves she can reinvent herself with a keystroke. Accompanied by a burst of brass, Austin's longtime ivory merchant pounds torrid tales of The Tattooed Lady and the Alligator Man and their sideshow endeavors on her fifth release for Alligator Records. Follow-up to the straight arrow Roadside Attractions in 2011, the NOLA boogie is punctuated by subtle appearances from fellow Lone Star staples. Delbert McClinton's freight train harmonica on "Can't Blame Nobody but Myself" ups the ante, followed




by Thad Scott's jubilant tenor saxophone and Wendy Moten's soulful backup vocals engulfing "Just Keep Holding On." Meanwhile Ball croons in her feathery drawl, running the gamut from beery honky-tonk ("Like There's No Tomorrow") to electric groove ("Lazy Blues"). She tames R&B nostalgia with a tender rendition of "He's the One," a Fifties Hank Ballard classic, then steers back into Texas country with the accordion-laced "The Squeeze Is On." The album arrives rightly dedicated to Marcia Ball's fellow Austin cornerstone, late singer-songwriter Sarah Elizabeth Campbell, who, before succumbing to cancer last December, embraced her craft and peers above everything else.

PHOEBE HUNT & THE GATHERERS Walk With Me

(Popped Corn) Phoebe Hunt wears many masks as frontwoman for the Gatherers. They're a little pop, a

little jazz, and a lot



of shades of country. Alongside fellow Belleville Outfit veteran Connor Forsyth, the Brooklyn-via-Austin crooner explores several influences on Walk With Me, but never quite manages to set any roots deep enough. As the album title indicates, Hunt's jazz-tinged voice works best at a strolling pace. Purposefully recalling Patsy Cline melancholy, she wafts through the standout title track, a dreamy Fifties love ballad. Even so, the Cajun spice that peppers "Walk of Angeline" plays out more naturally, Hunt's fiddle picking up the pace to a jaunt. As "Warm Summer's Evening" winds the disc to a close with a lovely, light touch of Billie Holidayinspired crooning, it nevertheless feels like Phoebe Hunt gave us 11 vignettes rather than the big picture.

BEN **BALLINGER** The State I'm In (Good Horse)

He's not talking about the state of Texas. You see Ben Ballinger needs help. Sonically, the young



balladeer's fifth collection of songs doesn't stray far from his previous work, only now he finds himself desperate and alone. While striving for the same soulful Americana touched on by Ray LaMontagne and Ryan Adams, the Oregon transplant draws too heavily on his emotional state heading south with unfortunate and oppressive results. One high point, the arresting rant "Ashes to Ashes," finds Ballinger the preacher doing his best Nick Cave while a pedal steel whines and horn section adds exclamation points. Elsewhere, "Cellphone" just seems silly: "I wish I was a cell phone to be held and caressed/ Given so much attention. I'd be in heaven to be held in your hand." Among Austin's better young songsmiths, Ben Ballinger's need for a mentor has never been more apparent.

DELTA **SPIRIT** Into the Wide (Dualtone)

Originated in southern California and having made its last two discs in Brooklyn,





Sharon Jones' new millennial emergence put sweet soul music back into the mainstream. Not only did the Brooklyn dynamo's indie rock favor throw the spotlight back on forgotten elders Bettye LaVette, Charles Bradley, and Lee Fields, it sparked seminal new acts including Jones' Dap-Kings and Mayer Hawthorne. Welcome Soul Track Mind to the latter stable. Like fellow locals Hard Proof and Latasha Lee & the Blackties, STM works its home-



grown circuit like James Brown tirelessly. Its third LP dishes a hot, horn-fed, electric guitaretched platter of hard modern R&B

Unbreakable continually urges groovers to "Turn It Up," and you will - repeatedly. From the explosive garage soul of opener "Ode to Youth," which makes the Black Keys sound white, to the acoustic thump of the closing title cut, the album's propulsive 31 minutes arrive without an audible seam or crack in the sonic veneer. Its musical arc folds in 2010 debut Ghost of Soul and last April's self-titled sophomore disc, and here nets fireworks only. Strutting "Fight for Love," loping "Silhouette," and piano skitter "Remember Me" sound the arrival of Soul Track Mind not only locally, but with any luck and lots of hard touring, on a national scale.

TEMPLE UNDERGROUND New Dawn

In yesteryears, drummers of Brannen Temple's caliber claimed very public starring roles as bandleaders. By way of his namesake band, the Austinite follows in the footsteps of Art Blakey, Chick Webb, and Buddy Rich on the kaleidoscopic New Dawn. A cosmic Temple descends on the opening "Drum Solo," establishing his presence from the jump. Firmly planted, things quickly turn terrestrial on the grooving rhythm of the title track. James Robinson's hypnotizing falsetto lovingly pierces the main

arteries, pumping tenderness and compunction throughout the



recording. The alien Temple reemerges on "Abstract," a track that takes three distinct turns, brimming with spectacular tempo changes, supple fills, and strong guitar play. Its R&B/metal hybridization then carries over onto the succeeding "Atmospheric." The most cohesive moment occurs on "Torn," a first-rate pop anthem equipped with a heavyweight hook. The fuzzy structure of New Dawn means its half-life fades a bit faster than desired, themes building on top of each other, yet playfully hurtles ideas at

the listener without the requirement of commitment on either end, each track a dalliance of mutual convenience. ★★★

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
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Dear Luv Doc,




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

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
