

Chronicle Endorsements

Austin City Council

Mavor: Mike Martinez

Entering the run-off, we're aware that Martinez faces an uphill battle: He was behind 37-30% in the first round, his broadest support appears to be in lower-turnout districts, and the only public poll available suggests his opponent Steve Adler is far ahead. Nevertheless, we continue to believe Martinez is the better candidate to succeed at the job, based on his "distinguished and persuasive record of accomplishment that includes ... his successful leadership at Capital Metro, his sustained and finally successful support for single-member districts, his effective advocacy for workers' rights, working conditions, and wages ... and even his persistent effort to make Austin a 'no-kill' city." We would add that Martinez's detractors get leverage from the fact that he has an actual record, voting pro and con, on the dais. It's all too easy to take potshots from an insulated perspective, not yet having had to make a tough decision that will inevitably disappoint some partisans. We believe that his specific experience and consistent advocacy for working people make Martinez the stronger candidate - especially to lead a City Council that will be heavy with inexperience. We encourage our readers to vote accordingly. **District 1: Ora Houston** As we noted in our initial endorsement,

both Houston and her run-off opponent DeWayne Lofton have long since earned the honorific of "public citizen." Lofton's advocacy has emphasized northeast neighborhood issues, while Houston is better known on citywide questions, but both have put in the time on boards and commissions and on the detail work of examining city policies on a range of issues and trying to find improvements. We're somewhat puzzled that Lofton would persist despite Houston's wide lead in the initial vote (49-14%), but he believes his voters will be more engaged, and we don't begrudge him the effort. As we wrote, "Houston knows the district and its needs well, and on Council should be a superb advocate for her constituents."

District 3: Sabino "Pio" Renteria

Entering the run-off against his sister, Susana Almanza, in nearly a dead heat. Renteria, the longtime community and neighborhood activist, remains the right choice. There is a marked difference between the two candidates' leadership styles, temperaments, and sense of community. The soft-spoken, persistent Renteria has a lengthy record of engag-

ing his community and building consensus (he currently serves as vice chair of the East Cesar Chavez Neighborhood Planning Team) and, like his opponent, has served on a number of city boards and commissions. Almanza has already been on the offensive: "I want to be clear - I'm not running against my brother; he's running against me," she told KLRU. That's characteristic of her organizing and campaign style, and more so of her longtime allies - short on civility, long on condescension. That approach creates little faith that she will seek productive collaboration on the dais. With leaping gentrification, affordability, and quality of life issues facing the largely low-income, Latino district, residents can ill afford to be led in a scorched-earth style. We stand by our initial endorsement of Renteria and feel strongly that the community advocate will not only engage the concerns of his neighbors but serve as a collaborative, productive figure on Council.

District 4: Greg Casar

In the first round, we had a difficult time choosing Casar over two other candidates -Katrina Daniel and Sharon Mays – who had distinguished themselves in District 4's wide field. There's no similar difficulty in the runoff, where Casar is not only the obvious choice but the default choice against opponent Laura Pressley. The strongest criticism of Casar is that he's young - but he's not inexperienced, having succeeded before Council as both an organizer and an advocate, helping to establish progressive policies on city contracts and workers' rights from his position at the Workers Defense Project. Moreover, in doing so, he not only spoke for workers traditionally excluded from city governance, he also engaged officials and employers in an unwavering, diplomatic, and effective way. Meanwhile, his opponent has been running a stealth campaign, evading her oftexpressed eccentric beliefs in favor of pandering declarations about spending and tax cuts. We strongly recommend Casar as the only choice for District 4 voters.

District 6: Jimmy Flannigan

Even when he had five opponents, Flannigan didn't have much competition for Most Capable Candidate. His pragmatism and eye for costs make him a good fit politically for his district, while his citywide reputation and relationships will allow him to actually get things done for his constituents. Both knowledgeable and confident, Flannigan, as we said in our previous endorsement, is "that rare breed of candidate capable of standing his ground when asked a difficult question, willing to patiently explain and defend his proposals." Of course his challenger, Don Zimmerman, isn't afraid to offer his honest opinion, either, even when it doesn't conform to that of the conservative establishment. We applaud that independent spirit. However, not only do we take issue with Zimmerman's unyielding belief that the solution to any problem with government is always less government, but we also condemn his combative style. Neither his prolific litigiousness nor his predilection for over-the-top rhetoric (such as the time he compared taxation to rape) are qualities that would serve Zimmerman or District 6 well on an 11-member Council.

District 7: Leslie Pool

We issued a dual first-round endorsement of both Jeb Boyt and Pool, and remain convinced that either candidate would make an excellent Council member. Both boast years of experience working on city boards and commissions and related work, and have specific, rooted perspectives on important municipal and district-centric issues like growth, transportation, affordability, and incentives for new businesses. Yet, just as with our initial endorsement of District 9 winner Kathie Tovo over fellow Council Member Chris Riley, we're inclined to support the candidate who better promotes carefully considered growth. That stretches from their respective stances on neighborhood housing and development through ideas for welcoming new businesses. Moreover, Boyt's claim to be the potential voice of the district's north end may be more subjective than substantive; in our conversations, Pool appears to have a clearer vision on how to best incorporate that part of the district north of Highway 183 into the more developed and established southern sector. Ultimately, going forward, the distinctions are undeniably small, and our recommendation of Pool is gualified by substantial enthusiasm for her opponent.

District 8: Ed Scruggs

District 8 voters left early forums with bemused smiles. How to choose between five such nice (and occasionally bland) candidates? Away from the spectacle of rowdy Council races elsewhere on Election Night, they answered their own question, ditching the moderates and pitting progressive Circle C Democrat Ed Scruggs against conservative Republican Ellen Troxclair in the run-off. In October, when we endorsed Scruggs, we noted his bulldog efforts to create a Democratic outpost in Circle C, his attention to thorny issues like global warming and gun control, and his affable leadership style. Troxclair, chief of staff to Tea Party state Rep. Jason Isaac, spins the same tired anti-tax rhetoric to great effect (winning the general by a slim margin), but District 8 ultimately needs more from its first elected Council member. With Scruggs' ability to listen and engage different perspectives, we continue to believe he's that person.

District 10: Mandy Dealey

Dealey's expertise – she's been on six boards and commissions and is a graduate of UT-Austin's LBJ School of Public Affairs pairs with her patient good nature to make an excellent choice for District 10. Although she's very much a Democrat - she's received virtually all of the local club endorsements -Dealey's lifetime commitment to civic engagement reflects a spirit of a public servant rather than a politician. She's someone who will work to improve both the lot of her district and that of the city as a whole. Her opponent, Sheri Gallo, a Realtor and legislative aide to a Republican state representative, also has a C.V. boasting an impressive history of volunteerism. But her positions on key issues are often vaguely general or, when more specific, lack empathy, such as her vocal opposition to the progress of an ordinance that would prevent property owners

BLUNT INSTRUMENT NOT ENOUGH

Dear Editor.

Austin needs to reduce the burden of property taxes on its longtime homeowners ["Point Austin: Color Me Exempt," News, Nov. 21]. Regrettably, we've got one blunt instrument. Ideally, we'd use a flat homestead exemption or one with a cap to direct most of the tax savings to low-income homeowners. Unfortunately, state law doesn't give us that option. Adler's proposed 20% exemption (without cap) still benefits the low-income homeowners, but has the unfortunate side effect of also sending savings to wealthier families who don't need a tax break. The proposal itself is progressive because low-income families spend a greater share of income on necessities, and thus the burden of the property tax - measured as a

percentage of discretionary income - falls more heavily on them.



She has also signed a tax cut "pledge" that not only commits her to ignore the city's future economic conditions, but in advance betrays her responsibility to make decisions as an elected official. District 10 would do well to elect the candidate who knows her stuff, understands that Council decisions must be based on actual evidence, and has the well-being of the whole district in mind: Mandy Dealey.

Austin Community College

ACC Trustee, Place 2: Gigi Edwards Bryant

Among six original candidates, our dual endorsement of Bryant and Jade Chang Sheppard bore fruit, and now we're required to recommend a preference. Bryant has long been active with the college's Foundation board, and brings both a long institutional memory and specific recommendations for upgrading college programs (while continuing her Foundation work). Chang Sheppard has a fresh businesswoman's perspective as well as professional expertise that would greatly aid the school's growing future. It's frankly a tough call between good choices, and both are fully qualified to take on the job. Our group judgment leaned slightly to Bryant but whoever wins the day, we urge both candidates to continue their admirable engagement with ACC.

Austin Independent School District

At-Large Position 9: Kendall Pace

There was little surprise that the race to replace retiring trustee Tamala Barksdale went to a run-off, and even less that District Advisory Council member Kendall Pace was one of the finalists. However, in a surprise to everyone, including the candidates, Pace is joined by UT undergraduate studies program coordinator Hillary

Procknow rather than business consultant and race relations expert Kazique Prince. Procknow had actually suspended her campaign to support Prince, but re-entered the race as a nod to both her support and Prince's hard work. She is an admirable candidate, and she and Pace agree on most core issues about opposing highstakes testing and the corporate takeover of schools. It has been refreshing to find two highly qualified candidates that agree on policy and get along personally. So while we laud both. Pace's institutional knowledge of the specifics of AISD give her the edge, and we feel confident in standing by our first-round endorsement.

District 1: Edmund "Ted" Gordon

As we've noted before, retiring incumbent Cheryl Bradley often promulgated an "Us vs. Them" approach, pitting AISD's often troubled northeast against the rest of the district. Now, just as the central administration has worked to heal those wounds, we believe UT's African and African Diaspora Studies Chair Gordon is best poised to move District 1 forward. As demonstrated by his work on the city's African American Quality of Life Initiative, he can be both critical and constructive. His opponent, KIPP Austin founder David "D" Thompson, is simply too thoroughly connected for our comfort to the backdoor privatizers of the "school reform" movement.

District 6: Paul Saldaña

A critical friend: That was what former AISD Superintendent Pat Forgione called the *Chronicle*, and that's how Saldaña describes his own perspective on AISD. Always prepared to challenge the district and demand innovation, he is well-placed to represent the diverse south-central zone of AISD. His runoff opponent, former Ann Richards School for Young Women Leaders teacher Kate Mason-Murphy, is energetic and committed, but Saldaña's longer record of engaging with the board makes him more qualified to become a member.







HEADLINES

CITY COUNCIL MEETS again in two weeks, Dec. 11, its final meeting of the year and last of the seven-member, at-large era. Last week's meeting (Nov. 20) left unfinished, much contentious business, including a potential decision on the proposed **Decker Lake golf course** and disputed **zoning cases**. Happy Thanksgiving?

HOLIDAY LIGHTS ARE blinking on around town: the Domain Christmas tree ignited last Saturday, the Zilker Holiday Tree blazes Sunday night (Nov. 30, 6pm), and the Mueller Tower "NOEL" lights will be lit Tuesday. Fire up that holiday spirit!

A GRAND JURY declined to indict Officer Darren Wilson for the Aug. 9 shooting of Michael Brown in Ferguson, Missouri. The announcement triggered massive peaceful demonstrations in many major cities, but initial TV coverage concentrated on the isolated violence in areas of Ferguson.

AS THE CHRONICLE went to press a day early this holiday week, a protest in nationwide solidarity – Austin Response to the Ferguson Grand Jury Decision – was being organized to take place outside the Austin Police Department, beginning at 6pm Tuesday. APD was already on "tactical alert" – on Monday, more than 300 officers participated in a surprise drill to prepare for possible protests.

MERIA CARSTARPHEN, FORMER superintendent of AISD, could oversee a massive reform of the Atlanta Public Schools after the APS board voted earlier this month to ask the Georgia Dept. of Education to grant them charter system status.

NO CHARGES FOR a Bastrop sheriff's deputy who Tasered a 17-year-old high school student in 2013. Noe Niño de Rivera suffered permanent brain damage when he fell to the ground after being Tasered in the hallway of **Cedar Creek High School**.

FRAN AND DAN Keller are seeking exoneration from the **Texas Court of Criminal Appeals**. As we reported last year, the Kellers were released from prison after serving over 20 years each "for a crime that few believe actually happened." A declaration of innocence from the court would allow the Kellers to be compensated for the years they lost.

A.G. GREG ABBOTT'S to-do list before he leaves office includes suing **President Obama** for violating the Constitution by taking **executive action on immigration**. At a press conference on Monday, Abbott said Obama is "endangering the constitutional structure."

THE COUPLES WHO sued to lift **Texas' samesex marriage ban** have returned to court to ask for immediate enforcement of Judge **Orlando Garcia's** earlier decision that the ban is unconstitutional. Garcia had issued a stay on his ruling; plaintiffs argue that the Supreme Court's recent actions denying and even lifting stays in other jurisdictions means Garcia should reconsider.



Not Again

WHO HAVE EARS TO HEAR, LET THEM HEAR

"And I must say tonight that a riot is the language of the unheard." – Martin Luther King, "The Other America," March 14, 1968

I can't claim any special wisdom on the ultimate meaning of the avalanche of events in Ferguson, Mo., but like a solitary marcher in a nationwide demonstration, I'll add my public voice to the collective outrage. What happened Monday night – what's been happening, really, for months in Ferguson – is yet another example of the intractable, endemic racism

that infects far too many of our governing institutions. That racism distorts, as in a funhouse mirror, every attempt at "justice" that is isolated from the larger social and historical context of racial and economic inequality. Beyond that, is the ongoing militarization of police forces – not only in tactics and weaponry, but in the presumption, virtually reflexive to prosecutors and grand juries, that like soldiers, police officers are

above the law they enforce, and not to be held accountable even for summary execution of unarmed people.

No, I have not read or reviewed all evidence, nor heard the scores of witnesses – literal or suborned – that St. Louis County Prosecuting Attorney Robert McCulloch paraded before the grand jury, seemingly for the purpose of avoiding his own dis-

cretion or else insulating himself from charges of bias. But I did listen to McCulloch attempt to justify, at great length, the grand jury's refusal to indict Officer Darren Wilson, by instead indicting the victim, Michael Brown, for the crime of stealing some cigars or, as Wilson claimed, for inexplicably running directly into gunfire, unarmed. And I've read the *quite incredible* testimony of Wilson, the armed person in this confrontation, who describes Brown as a "demon," a "Hulk Hogan," a fearless monster who keeps charging even after he's been shot – "like he was almost bulking up to run through the shots."

That's either an outright, self-justifying lie, or eyesight so distorted by racism that it's incapable of seeing straight.

Justice Needs a Hearing

We'll likely never precisely know what happened – the most important witness is dead. But we would have had a much better chance of doing so if the St. Louis County authorities, McCulloch chief among them, had allowed this matter to go to an open trial, with public testimony, public examination of the evidence, and public crossexamination of witnesses. Instead, in a

curiously timed late-evening announcement, McCulloch blamed irrelevant nonwitnesses, the victim, social media, and "the 24-hour news cycle" that he was even then taking advantage of, for what in fact appeared to be a heated confrontation and the angry overreaction of an armed man to an unarmed one.

In Austin, we're in no position to be smug about Ferguson; over the years we've had too many police shootings of young minority men, several of which evoke the Brown shooting, especially in the appearance of overreaction by panicked or angry officers. In most of those cases, Travis County grand juries predictably declined to indict the officers involved. The recent exception is the indictment of former Austin Police Department Detective Charles Kleinert in the shooting of Larry Jackson Jr., under circumstances eerily parallel to the Ferguson incident. Kleinert confronted Jackson on suspicion of some wrongdoing, and Jackson fled; seemingly enraged, Kleinert pursued and caught him. In their ensuing struggle, Jackson was shot and killed.

We still don't know the details, but because of the manslaughter indictment of Kleinert, we may eventually have a fuller idea. That should have been the outcome in Ferguson; instead, we're left hoping that the U.S. Department of Justice might in due course might bring some level of justice to Michael Brown's family.

Lift Every Voice

Although Martin Luther King Jr. remains best known as a peacemaker, he was also blunt. In his March 14, 1968 speech in Michigan, he told his audience, "There must be a recognition on the part of everybody in this nation that America is still a racist country. Now however unpleasant that sounds, it is the truth. And we will never solve the problem of racism, until there is a recognition of the fact that racism still stands at the center of so much of our nation, and we must see racism for what it is." While some audience members loudly denounced him as a "traitor," King described at length the institutional racism and economic oppression that create the circumstances that repeatedly end in what has transpired in Ferguson.

Dedicated to nonviolent action, King yet acknowledged that "a riot is the language of the unheard," especially when citizens peacefully and resolutely petition their government for justice, as the residents of Ferguson did for many months: "the promises of freedom and justice have not been met ... [and] large segments of white society are more concerned about tranquility and the status quo than about justice and humanity."

It's truly a shame – a national disgrace – that in these matters, so little has changed. That March night, King reiterated, "We shall overcome – because the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends towards justice." On April 4, he was murdered.

Who Needs 10-1?

GRUMPY MAYOR PROVIDES PLENTY OF DRAMA

Here in the fourth estate, we've been largely looking forward to the new story lines promised by the incoming 10-1 **City Council**: new faces, radical agendas, clashing egos, screaming matches on the dais if we get lucky. ... Yet for all of that, it's hard to imag-

ine a scene much uglier than what transpired last Thursday toward the end of the discussion over the **Decker Lake Golf Course** project, as Mayor **Lee Leffingwell**, who might be described as irascible on his better days, was not having one of those.

The mayor's record on water issues has long been atrocious, of course: from arguing against imposing watering restrictions for fear that doing so would "send a message to business" that we're in a water-challenged area, to ramrodding the ruinous **WTP4**, to flacking for this latest mess. But Thursday's performance took things to a new level, with Leffingwell slamming Austin Water Director Greg Meszaros for his rather equivocal answers about the

courses' water use, so personally that two Council colleagues felt compelled to apologize to Meszaros from the dais for Leffingwell's behavior.

One day after the **LCRA** suspended releases from the **Highland Lakes** for the fourth straight year, in view of what they called a "record-setting drought," Leffingwell railed at Meszaros that this is not the worst – but just the **second worst** – drought since the Highland Lakes dams were built early last century, and how dare he suggest that water use could be a problem. Nixing the proposal, as Council seemed poised to do, "is truly looking a gift horse in the mouth. And I don't want to be too critical, Mr. Meszaros, but I



think your attitude toward this has been counter to the interests of the city of Austin." (Though Meszaros' concerns were hardly the only issue with the proposal.)

First **Kathie Tovo**, then **Mike Martinez**, felt compelled to defend Meszaros' service

to the city. Martinez made it more personal: "Mr. Meszaros, my mom taught me as a little kid, don't ever apologize for another man's ill-fated actions, so I'm not going to start tonight. But I'm going to apologize to you for the lack of respect and decorum that was shown to you tonight. You have been through some of the most difficult times with this Council, starting with WTP 4, and leading up to tonight, and you have been nothing but professional, straightforward, honest, and respectful, each and every time we've asked you a question. So, I apologize."

Leffingwell did manage to keep the proposal alive for one more consideration on Dec. 11, which will keep the developer's attorney **Richard Suttle**

on the clock for another three weeks, though there clearly appeared to be no stomach elsewhere on the dais for considering the project. Sheryl Cole's original motion was to punt the discussion to the next Council in late February; Leffingwell offered a "friendly" amendment to bring it back Dec. 11 instead – and I think, given the mood he was in, Cole was afraid to point out that this was by no means friendly.

Postscript: On the next substantive issue to come up on the agenda, Leffingwell was the lone dissenting vote against the coyote conflict management plan, for fear that it would (I kid you not) keep folks from "**throwing rocks at coyotes**" (it won't). Good to know he has a retirement plan.

Discord Grows Over Springdale Farm

URBAN FARMS UNREST CONTINUES AS ITEMS HIT THE DAIS

Tensions remained high at last Thursday's City Council meeting, with drama both inside and outside Council chambers. A full house waited until after midnight for items 145-147 - zoning measures set to determine the future of Springdale Farm. Heated public testimony saw neighbors speak out for and against the proposed changes. Opponents of the changes cited noise from events, lack of parking, and a strong emphasis on the consumption of alcohol at weddings and fundraisers, and at Eden East, the farm-to-table mobile food trailer located on the property. They maintained they did not want to shut down the farm, but are opposed to an "event center." Neighbors in support of the Springdale items disputed the noise and traffic claims, and touted the farm as a community resource and greenspace.

Rosa Santis, who owns numerous properties in the area, began her testimony with a reminder that she pays nearly \$1 million in taxes and has never asked for support from any government to be successful. (However, Santis did receive a loan of almost \$200,000 through the city of Austin's Family Business Loan Program last year to refinance a build-



ing on East Sixth.) "Do they need a bailout of their economic problems?" asked Santis.

Commentary continued with District 3 run-off candidate and co-founder of **PODER**, **Susana Almanza**, who criticized the *Chronicle*'s coverage of the issue. "*The Austin Chronicle* is fueling the fire of hatred, making it seem that poor and working-class poor people of color are trying to shut down the poor farmers that own five acres of land who should be allowed to have events every weekend, with no regards to their neighbors and/or the communities."

Almanza's run-off opponent, her brother **Sabino "Pio" Renteria**, sang a different tune at the Springdale rally outside the City Hall. "The items before Council are not about one farm or one business, they are about our community as a whole," he said. "This will be an ongoing struggle, I want to assure you that I will be there," he added. "We need to decide whether we want to have positive and inclusive leadership or continue with the same old politics."

Testimony from Almanza and Santis reflected a continuation of an earlier confrontation (one of many) outside Council Chambers in which Almanza and Santis approached Springdale Farm employees asking if the farm sold alcohol, how much the employees were paid, and why the employees would continue to support the farm. Almanza then reminded Springdale's Glenn Foore, who had approached the gathering crowd, that she sat on the board that initially approved the loan allowing them to operate their landscaping business. The spectacle continued with a brief dust-up between Govalle/Johnston Terrace Neighborhood Chair Daniel Llanes and political consultant Mykle Tomlinson over an alleged elbow thrown by Tomlinson but unseen by security, with Llanes grabbing Tomlinson and yelling, "We aren't going to do this here." Then, there was the distribution of Angelica Noyola's mug shot, prompting Noyola to alert authorities outside of City Hall.

For Council's part, they voted 6-0 on first reading against amending the **Future Land Use Map** (FLUM) from single family to mixed use, after reassurance from the **Planning and Development Review Department**'s **Jerry Rusthoven** that a FLUM amendment would not be necessary for the farm to apply for a Conditional Use Permit. Adamantly against

COUNCIL: DANCE THE LAST DANCE ...

The days dwindle down to a precious few, and the calendar shows only one more meeting for this historic, seven-member edition of the **City Council**. Not sure if they'll have any ceremonial recognition of the occasion, but they will certainly have plenty of work to do. Last week's agenda (Nov. 20) featured 182 Items, and the incumbents worked their way through quite a bunch – but they also punted or continued many to Dec. 11, and even a few to 2015 – so the new 10-1 Council is already accumulating its own tasks.

One issue that may or may not drift into next year is the **Decker Lake golf course** proposal, which – after plenty of debate between proponents and opponents – looked at one point like it might move forward, until Austin Water Director **Greg Meszaros**' concerns about potential water issues (even using reclaimed water) triggered anger from Mayor **Lee Leffingwell** (who supports the project), an apology to Meszaros for Leffingwell's treatment of him from Council Member **Mike Martinez**, and a postponement to at least Dec. 11 (Mayor Pro Tem **Sheryl Cole** initially proposed a postponement until late February). In the meantime, stakeholders and staff are expected to discuss the options.

In other matters, Council: • Approved a hybrid version of the **CodeNEXT** (land development code) revision process, with amendments by Council Member **Bill Spelman** finding a flexible sweet spot between options 2 and 3 (middling revision vs. full revision), essentially depending on specific circumstance.

• Approved an interim measure on Downtown construction **overnight concrete pours**, for 120 days limiting night pouring to between 7pm and 2am, while stakeholders and staff revisit the matter – including the discussion that laying concrete is a much more complicated, weather-and-traffic conditioned process than most observers ever imagined.

• Finally adopted a "coyote conflict management strategy," that would emphasize discouraging interactions between coyotes, people, and domestic animals and de-emphasize trapping and extermination. We're waiting to hear from the coyotes.

• Took a step forward on the **Springdale Farms** rezoning battle, with approval of some but not all of the farm's requests to enable it to hold public events despite some neighborhood opposition. The debate is hardly settled; see above.

• Extended the **Austin Pets Alive!** lease on the former Town Lake Animal Center.

Matters postponed or scheduled for Dec. 11 review include: revisions of city auditor's responsibilities; a public hearing on swimming in Barton Creek downstream of the pool ("Barking Springs"); a public hearing on the Colony Park Master Plan; a lengthy list of zoning hearings either postponed or approved on first reading only; third reading of the "microunit" proposal that would enable small accessory living units in single-family residential neighborhoods.

Lesson for January: A Council's work is never done. – Michael King

amending the FLUM in this case, the Govalle/ Johnston Terrace Contact Team (along with Almanza) last supported an amendment to the FLUM in 2013 for ThinkEast, the \$35 million development slated for 1141 Shady and 5300 Jain Lane, which ultimately converted 24 acres from single family and mixed use to major planned development.

On the second item, Council voted 5-1 to allow outdoor entertainment as a conditional use, with council members Laura Morrison voting no and Bill Spelman off the dais. Morrison expressed disappointment in the lack of productive dialogue and strongly urged the two sides to negotiate by utilizing city staff and/or a mediator. "The conversations just aren't working yet," she said. Kathie Tovo mirrored Morrison's concerns, adding that parking and the consumption of alcohol near a school need to be addressed. Springdale Farm's Paula Foore said she is open to mediation and negotiating an agreement, though her preference would be to work directly with those who live near the farm. "Last year we met with the contact team for mediation, and it was completely unproductive. The real consideration needs to be working with our neighbors, especially those within 200 feet," said Foore after the Council meeting. Further, according to the city of Austin Planning and Development Review Department, the Govalle/Johnston Terrace Contact Team is out of compliance with City Code.

With a vote of 6-0 (and Spelman off the dais), Council moved to postpone item 147, which would address the termination of the restrictive covenant stating that if the farm ceased to run its landscaping business, its zoning would revert to light industrial and single family. The item will move to a final vote on Dec. 11, while the outdoor entertainment item will have a second and third reading. - Anna Toon

HACA RESIDENTS OFFERED FREE GOOGLE FIBER

Austin is slated to take a major leap toward bridging the city's digital divide, city and state leaders announced last Thursday afternoon. In partnership with **Google Fiber**, the city is offering 4,300 public housing residents living in the 18 **Housing Authority of the City of Austin** developments across the city a chance to join the upcoming high-speed Internet rollout for free (or at least a nominal cost) for the next decade. The broader Google Fiber rollout is expected to hit South and Southeast Austin starting in December.

Flanked by newly minted U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Secretary Julián Castro and state Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin, HACA president and CEO Michael Gerber delivered the message outside East Austin's Booker T. Washington Terraces. The plan, Gerber

said, would alter the cultural fabric of Austin and help close the gap between the digital haves and have-nots.

"If you lack access to the Internet, or don't have access to a computer or tablet; or if you don't understand the Internet's relevance to your daily life, then you're even farther apart and more separated from your community and its resources," said Gerber. "All too often that separateness has been the case for residents of public housing. ... For us, the Internet is an information superhighway, but for kids and families in public housing, the Internet, at times, is more like an information bike path."

Dubbed "Unlocking the Connection," the new program, led by nonprofit **Pathways Youth & Family Services** and supported by

a dozen business, philanthropic, and academic partners, is meant to engage traditionally underserved, low-income communities, and thus those most likely to be disconnected. African-Americans, the elderly, those earning less than \$30,000, and those without a high school diploma are statistically more inclined to be left offline.

Austin public housing residents largely fit the category – the average household income for a public housing family hovers at \$14,000 a year; many are elderly and most minority, per 2013-14 data from HACA. Speakers, such as Georgian Manor public housing resident **Rachel Martinez**,

made the connection between equitable access to technology and social and economic mobility, pointing to the myriad opportunities lost when home web browsing isn't a reality – job searches, education and research, health care information, and civic participation. "My son uses a computer to work on his résumé, because if he wants a job, he has to apply online," said Martinez.

The goal is three-pronged: Aside from the Internet connection, the program will provide tech devices – **Austin Community College** has donated 600 pieces of computer equipment for the first year alone. Corporate sponsors are also contributing – the **Ford** and

Open Society foundations have

thus far provided \$300,000. Lastly – and "arguably the most important," according to Gerber – the plan includes a digital literacy component coupled with science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) training. For instance, Google is subsidizing training at **Austin Free-Net**, the Eastside non-profit dedicated to closing the digital gap.

The digital inclusion plan is said to be completely novel; never before has a city's housing authority extended this type of service to its community. Castro, who left his post as San Antonio mayor in July for HUD, shared his hope that the trailblazing Austin plan will be used as a template elsewhere. "It's clear that without broadband, folks are

less likely to graduate high school, less likely to get highpaying, 21st century jobs – they start out at a disadvantage," said Castro. "So what you're doing here in Austin is a national model for what ought to happen in the United States of America for our young people."

There are potential roadblocks. First, neighborhoods (or "**Fiberhoods**") must meet signup goals for the service, and part of that means getting enough interested residents on board – program partners said they're geared up to rally as many community members as possible. And while Google will build the fiber optic network infrastructure for free at



"serviceable" HACA properties, as well as provide home Internet connection setups and service for 10 years at no cost, residents will need to pay the \$10 pre-registration fee, a possible (albeit minimal, compared to the waived \$300 construction fee) barrier for low-income Austinites. And lastly, the service is not quite equivalent to the famed 1 gigabit per second provided by Google Fiber, but still speedy 5 megabits per second. (Residents can upgrade at any point – for a price.)

Overall, the plan appears to be an impressive effort to increase digital inclusion and a strategic effort by Google to bypass the problems associated with its first, 2011 Fiber rollout, in **Kansas City**. Surveys reflect that Google Fiber is largely being adopted by those who already have Internet access, and very rarely by the low-income and minority residents who should most benefit.

The digital inclusion strategy will be rolled out over three years, simultaneously with the larger Austin network plan. In a separate announcement by Google Fiber on Monday, the Internet giant unveiled pricing plans for its Austin services and a sneak peak of its new Downtown "Fiber Space," at 201 Colorado St. (site of the former Austin Children's Museum). The tech-equipped space, to be open in December, will serve as a meeting spot for town halls, live music, field trips, and a DIY production studio – precise date to be determined. "We aren't being coy," said **Mark Strama**, head of **Google Fiber-Austin**. "We just don't want to get it wrong." – Mary Tuma

The supposedly nonpartisan race has become tinged with party politics, not least because his opponent Ellen Troxclair is chief of staff to rampant Tea Partier Rep. Jason Isaac, R-Dripping Springs... Tina Cannon crossed "the invisible party line" to endorse her former opponent Sheri Gallo for D10. In a lengthy post on Facebook explaining her decision, she wrote, "I feel that Sheri's balanced approach, business smarts, budgetary expertise, collaborative nature and true bi-partisanship is what D10 needs to truly reflect our residents"...

D3 contenders Susana Almanza and Sabino "Pio" Renteria squared off at last week's City Council meeting. Almanza was there to decry Springdale Farm (and the Chronicle's coverage of the story, see p.20). while her brother, Renteria, was there to show his support for urban farms... Former D3 candidates are getting behind Steve Adler: Shaun Ireland has endorsed Adler over Martinez, while Fred McGhee penned a lengthy blog post titled "Why the Guy From Rockdale Should be Rejected as Austin Mayor," defending of Adler. In it, McGhee makes the case that "Martinez left the middle class long ago," and is "simply too average" to be trusted as mayor. 

Ride-Booking Surges at ABIA

AVIATION DEPARTMENT AND COMMISSION REACT TO TNC INVASION

It's been a rough couple of weeks for **Uber**. Vice President **Emir Michael** was caught suggesting oppo-slam campaigns against journalists critical of the company, while his firm spent much of November fending off accusations of personal data breaches, abuses of proprietary information, and lowering driver income while flooding the market for rides-for-hire. It's almost enough to make you grateful for taxicab regulation.

Nevertheless, Uber's Austin rollout proceeds. The **Airport Advisory Commission** has been busy trying to sort out how exactly to apply the concept of city regulations to **transportation network companies** like


Uber and others, for Austin-**Bergstrom International Airport** (where TNCs are currently prohibited from doing business). The latest iteration, presented two weeks ago at the Department of Aviation, calls for a hybrid concoction that combines city standards (e.g., a licensing requirement) with regulations already enforced for cabbies (required transponders, and the \$1 per ride fee that comes with them, so the airport can track on-site activity). "Dynamic pricing" by TNCs would remain in effect, as would data sharing, and all other terms of the city's agreement with the companies. Violations would result in a class C misdemeanor and a fine - that Uber and competitor Lyft would likely pay without hesitation from company funds.

The issue now rests in the Department of Aviation's ability to get Uber and Lyft to play fair in negotiations and ultimately comply – no small task. The sentiment coming from the policymakers at the AAC meeting two weeks ago suggested that any attempt to enforce actual rules on these companies would be futile and disruptive.

"Today, Uber and Lyft are already operating at the airport," noted **Patti Edwards**, director of operations for the Department of Aviation. "To try to control and stop them from operating at the airport would be more manpower-intensive than to try to work with them to try to come up with something that provides a benefit not only to the people who visit Austin but to provide a revenue stream for the airport."

Indeed, we've seen what kind of alternatives TNCs will resort to if kept from doing business as they wish. Uber and Lyft have defied municipal regulations in **San Francisco**, while catering to **Nashville** because of the city's light regulation. Earlier this month, emails leaked between Uber and its **Miami** drivers detailing what to do to avoid getting caught by airport officials while servicing rides.


AAC secretary **D'Ann Johnson** doesn't see the TNCs' defiant tactics as an acceptable reason for legitimizing the status quo, and raises potential problems that may occur if these companies are allowed to work at the airport unchecked. "You have cab drivers who consistently work the airport in the summertime, when it's real slow," she said. "And not just during **South by Southwest**." Uber and Lyft drivers who choose to take advantage of Austin's abundant festival schedule would be cherry-picking airport service times, she said, and benefiting from what could fast become a very serious increase in



surge pricing. Chances are as well that they'd discourage cab drivers that arriving passengers rely on during less highdemand hours.

In turn, for those who do arrive and immediately get hit with a hair-raising surge rate (and not a standard rate as required of cab drivers) their first impression of Austin will be that of increasingly high costs. "There are a lot of issues here involved with protecting [cab drivers] who work the airport during slow times, and protecting people who come into this airport, and need a ride to where they're going," Johnson added. "Just because the city did it [allowed TNC operation] doesn't mean the airport has to do it."

Edwards said she hopes to sit down to negotiate terms with the TNCs soon. Her concluding sentiment summed up the city and Aviation Department's predicament: "We only make rules that we can enforce." – Chase Hoffberger



Executing the Mentally (and Physically) Ill

Should the state of Texas proceed with the execution of **Scott Panetti** on Wednesday, Dec. 3, it will be ending the life of a man now better known for the manner in which he defended himself on trial than for the crime that put him on death row. Panetti was sentenced to death in Sept. 1995 for the 1992 murder of his estranged wife's parents, **Joe** and **Amanda Alvarado**, but the legal merry-go-round he's endured since being convicted has spun out over 19 years and multiple courts (including two trips to the **U.S. Supreme Court**), sparking national debate about the mental competence standard for executions.

Panetti, 56, had a long history of mental illness by the time he killed the Alvarados. After being diagnosed with schizophrenia in 1978, he was hospitalized more than 12 times between 1981 and 1992, and frequently acted out. In 1986, he slashed the walls of his home with a knife and buried furniture in his backyard in an attempt to exorcise advancing demons.

In the first days of September 1992, his wife **Sonja**, by then living with her parents, tried unsuccessfully to turn Panetti's guns over to the police after a fight between the couple. (The cops said they had no legal right to confiscate the firearms.) A few days later, Panetti shaved his head, dressed himself in military fatigues, and drove to Sonja's parents' house in Fredericksburg. There, he shot both Joe and Amanda Alvarado at close range with a rifle, and then ran off with Sonja and their infant daughter to a bunkhouse. Caught in a standoff with the police, Panetti released the two, and eventually surrendered, declaring that "Sarge" - later identified as a recurring auditory hallucination - was responsible for the murders.

After two hearings in 1994 to determine his mental competency, Panetti fired his attorneys and represented himself throughout his brief Sept. 1995 trial. He infamously dressed in a purple cowboy suit and subpoenaed upwards of 200 people – including **Jesus Christ, John F. Kennedy**, and **Anne Bancroft**. He cross-examined his alter-ego ("Sarge"), scribbled ink over important legal documents and medical records, and at one point berated a prospective jury member about having "Indian blood." The trial lasted eight days. After two hours of deliberation, a jury found Panetti guilty and recommended capital punishment.

Immediate appeals of his conviction were denied, and in 2003 Panetti received an execution date of Feb. 5, 2004. His attorneys filed a motion for a stay of execution, claiming that their client was mentally incompetent to be executed. But two mental health experts appointed by Kerr Co. District Judge Stephen Ables declared that Panetti was, in fact, competent enough for death (Ables ruled Panetti had "the ability to understand the reason he is to be executed"). Upon review, federal District Judge Sam Sparks found the state court's reasoning "constitutionally inadequate" but ultimately ruled against Panetti, citing the 5th Circuit of Appeals' "test for competency to be executed," which requires a person "know no more than the fact of his impending execution and the factual predicate for the execution."

In 2007, Panetti's case went to the U.S. Supreme Court. The majority determined that condemned inmates must have some "rational understanding" of why they're being executed, and sent the case back to the district court for a fuller consideration of Panetti's mental state. Judge Sparks ruled that Panetti was sane enough to be executed. A second appeal to the 5th Circuit proved unsuccessful in Aug. 2013. Early last month, the Supreme Court refused to consider a final appeal. A state district judge signed a warrant on Oct. 16 to set a Dec. 3 execution date. Panetti's attorney Kathryn Kase learned of the final decision when she read about it in the newspaper.

Kase filed an emergency court motion on Nov. 3, requesting that Panetti, who hasn't been evaluated in seven years, receive a final examination of his mental state. On Nov. 20, Kase and fellow attorney Gregory Wiercioch filed a motion asking that the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals halt Panetti's execution due to his incompetency. On Nov. 25, that motion was denied. In recent weeks, former congressman Ron Paul and former Texas governor Mark White (who oversaw 19 executions himself), in addition to many other health officials and Christian leaders, have stepped forward to oppose the execution. A petition started by Panetti's sister asking for clemency has accumulated more than 77,000 signatures. If their efforts are unsuccessful, Panetti will become the 12th inmate executed this year, and the 520th since the reinstatement of Texas' death penalty in 1976.

THE SOFFAR CASE

Meanwhile, the fight to save terminally ill death row inmate Max Soffar continues this month with the submission of a petition, containing over 116,000 signatures, asking Governor **Rick Perry** to release the 58-year-old. Soffar was arrested in 1980 for a Houston bowling allev murder of three teenagers, though his lengthy interrogation was notoriously aggressive and yielded only a limited audio recording. Soffar, who's long suffered from brain damage, and had the mental capacity of an 11-year-old when he was arrested for the murders, maintains that he did not actually rob the bowling alley or commit the execution-style murder, but mishandled his implicating of a friend in an attempt to receive a \$15,000 reward. Soffar was diagnosed with liver cancer in 2013. In September, attorney Brian Stull reported that Soffar isn't expect to live past Feb. 2015, though he's yet to receive an execution date -33 years after being arrested for the murder.

Supporters of Rodney Reed, who was scheduled to be executed on Jan. 14, 2015, came out for an evidentiary hearing in Bastrop on Tuesday, Nov. 25. Reed's lawyers have repeatedly sought additional DNA testing in the case - it's been widely speculated that Stacey Stites, whom Reed was convicted of killing in 1998, was actually murdered by her fiancé, former police sergeant Jimmy Lewis Fennell, who's currently serving a prison sentence for the 2007 kidnapping and rape of Connie Lear. The judge denied the motion for more testing, but rescheduled the execution for March 5, 2015. – Chase Hoffberger



THE END OF S-COMM? PRESIDENTIAL ORDER PROTECTS MILLIONS, LIMITS ICE DETAINERS

Local immigrant advocates applauded last week's executive order by President **Barack Obama** shielding millions from immediate deportation – particularly given the action's potential to dismantle the **Secure Communities** program that's already banished thousands of people from Travis County.

"I'm really pleased with the steps he's taken," said **Barbara Hines**, clinical professor of law and co-director of the immigration clinic at the UT-Austin School of Law. "It allows members of our community to no longer live in fear. Children don't have to worry their parents won't be there when they come back from school."

Last Wednesday's order, essentially a reordering of Department of Justice priorities, protects from immediate deportation 4.4 million parents of U.S. citizens and green cardholders. Another 290,000 are being made eligible for **Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals**, which originally granted immigrants born after 1981 who had entered the country before June 15, 2007 eligibility for renewable two-year work permits and exemption from deportation. Under the expanded program, immigrants of any age who were brought to the U.S. as children and arrived before Jan. 1, 2010, will be eligible, and the permits will be for three - rather than two years. Some noted that the president's action remained a partial step. Workers Defense Project Executive Director Cristina **Tzintzún** posted a statement, saving in part: "President Obama took an important first step in repairing this system. ... This executive action still leaves millions vulnerable and is a temporary fix to a problem that requires long-term solutions. Congress must act and pass comprehensive immigration reform that provides a pathway to citizenship. Only with such a solution can we hope for a safe, sustainable, and united future."

But it was the likely end of S-Comm that provoked the most celebration.

"That program is done," said **Amelia Ruiz-Fischer** of the **Texas Civil Rights Project**. She joined U.S. Rep. **Lloyd Doggett** and fellow advocates in a press conference lauding the move Friday. "This program the government has poured millions of dollars on is over. It's good to step back, take a breath, and recognize this is a really big victory." **Cristina Parker**, immigration projects coordinator for **Grassroots Leadership**, shared in the elation. She joined a group of some 30 demonstrators in front of the Capitol the day after the announcement in calling for even broader protections. "S-Comm creates community distrust," she said, quoting Department of Homeland Security Secretary **Jeh Johnson**. "That's what we've been saying all along! We feel vindicated."

Several grassroots organizations have been working in opposition to S-Comm, which has led to deportation of some 5,000 undocumented immigrants in Travis County since its 2009 implementation. Under S-Comm, the sheriff's office detains arrestees suspected of being undocumented, holding them in county jail for a minimum 48-hour period until a **U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement** agent can confirm their status and act on deportation proceedings.

Sheriff **Greg Hamilton** has been unmoved by S-Comm opposition in the past. And apparently, even a presidential executive order, sidestepping Congressional approval, is insufficient to soften that position. The **Travis County Sheriff's Office** remained officially unyielding, vowing to continue honoring detainers. "President Obama's executive order does not change the stance of the Travis County Sheriff's Office on cooperating with all law enforcement entities," Major **Wes Priddy** said in a prepared statement on Hamilton's behalf. "We have always honored detainers placed on inmates by others jurisdictions and we will continue to do so. Changes may occur within the federal government, but because we do not place detainers, nor do we deport anyone, we will continue to operate in the same manner we have been operating."

S-Comm's days in Travis County may, indeed, be numbered, but it remains to be seen if its replacement will be an improvement. As TCSO spokeswoman **Lisa Block** explained it: "The Secure Communities program is being replaced by the **Priority Enforcement Program**. We are reviewing the details of this new program, and as was previously stated, we will continue to cooperate with other law enforcement agencies, including ICE. Please keep in mind that this is a brand new change to the law that requires review, and we are



Something has changed in education politics, and Robert Schneider has seen the shift. Twelve years ago, when he first ran for District 7 in the Austin Independent School District, "It was the PTA folks who ran for the board." That means, a decade ago, a candidate like former Austin Council of PTAs president Monica Sanchez would have romped home in District 6. Instead, this time she was third in a three-horse race, not even making the run-off. In part, Schneider ascribes such upsets to changing demographics in the electorate. He said, "We have more tech folks, we have more younger folks." That change has an unintended consequence. "It's an opportunity for people with very deep pockets to buy seats in the school district."

He should know. Schneider has always faced stiff competition in his southwestern district. But this time around was a little different. Education advocacy group Austin Kids First doubled down on his opponent, Yasmin Wagner, dropping roughly \$40,000 in contributions and in-kind expenditures into her challenge. Why target the veteran trustee? Wagner always said on the campaign trail that it was because he was unresponsive to his community. Maybe that was what motivated her, but, Schneider thinks there's another reason why Austin Kids First came after him. "They've got a political agenda, rather than an education agenda," he said. "I'm not a big radical reformer like they are."

Before we proceed, there are three organizations you need to know – starting with Austin Kids First. Founded in 2012, its declared purpose is to get voters engaged in AISD board elections, and encourage high-quality candidates to run. Leadership for Educational Equity does basically the same thing, at the national level. And then there's Teach for America, the national organization that puts recent college grads into struggling schools.

It all seems quite noble. Great teachers. Great schools. Enthusiastic young people, doing a couple of years of energetic teaching, simultaneously becoming more rounded citizens. But, according to Ken Zarifis, president of Education Austin, the school employees' union, there's a big catch. "It's all the same vague comments about 'the best schools' and 'the best teachers' – the broad strokes that everybody wants, but they never define what a good teacher is or a good school or a good trustee."

There's a line in *The Usual Suspects*: "The greatest trick the devil ever pulled was convincing the world he didn't exist." In the case of the pro-charter, pro-voucher, anti-union coalition known as the "education reform" movement, the greatest trick

was grabbing a suitably nebulous name (or group of names), and promoting their cause through equally nebulous, feelgood terms. Zarifis is far from sanguine about their intentions. "When I hear 'reform,' the first word that comes to mind is destruction," he said. "They want to take public education out of the hands of the public,

and control it themselves. It comes from billionaires like Michael Bloomberg, who don't understand what it's like to be in a classroom with 35 kids for 90 minutes, and spending every one of those 90 trying to make sure they learn something."

The suspicion is that there's a game plan, and groups like AKF, TFA, and LEE all play a role. Reformers push metrics like school "accountability" standards that serve to make perfectly acceptable schools appear to be chronic failures. Groups like TFA air-drop student teachers into the neediest school districts and claim that they're "saving schools" – with the implication that existing teachers, with their contracts and experience and training and union protections – are just serving their self-interests. Then charter groups and voucher advocates gin up talk of "school choice," and cream off the best students, leaving public schools with the most struggling students, diminishing finances, and demoralized teachers.

INVEST NATIONALLY ... VOTE LOCALLY

How does a candidate get the Austin Kids First endorsement? According to Executive Director Stephen de Man, the process is utterly transparent, "with the purpose of getting trustees who are about putting kids first. Thus the name." Candidates fill out a questionnaire, then meet with board members, and an endorsement – with resulting contributions – is made. "Everything's super-transparent. But we look for certain qualities that go beyond litmus-test issues."

In the At-Large Position 9 race, AKF backed Kendall Pace. She now faces UT program director Hillary Procknow in the run-off, and she has the AKF blessing and cash to help her. Pace said she modeled her campaign on that of Trustee Gina Hinojosa in 2012, even using the same commercial firm for her TV spots. When it came to AKF, she filled out their candidate form, and then met with de Man and John Armbrust, the executive director at charter group Austin Achieve Public Schools, at Cherrywood Coffeehouse. After that, AKF donated \$35,000, which she used to pay for her TV time. However, that was not the end of their assistance. "People came up to me afterwards and said, 'Oh my god, I like your flier.' I'm like, 'what flier?'" AKF had actually paid for two different mailers on her behalf and, in keeping with state campaign "non-coordination" laws about such dark money expenditures, they had never informed her that they existed.

Beyond legal restrictions, the group has pretty strict rules about contact with candidates. No donor that contributes more than \$500 can take part in the endorsement process, and then the group has no contact, beyond normal board operations and meetings, with trustees outside of the election. That's not their purpose, de Man said. "We're not issue-driven: 'Are you pro-this or anti-this?' Two years ago, it was hard for people to understand. How can a group have this money, spend this money, and not have an agenda?"

Austin Kids First at least appears indigenous. But there's nothing local about Leadership for Educational Equity – the D.C.-based group that spent almost \$6,000 on District 1 candidate David "D" Thompson, who's in a run-off with UT-Austin department chair Edmund "Ted" Gordon.

Thompson's platform is laudable: "Having incredible teachers in East Austin, focus on gaps [between] our lowincome and high-income students, and between our white students and students of color." But that's the kind of bland rhetoric that drives critics of the reform movement (like

Zarifis) crazy. Doesn't everyone want all of that? Moreover, doesn't it imply that the current advocates for schools aren't doing everything they can to reach those goals? During the first round of this election, eyebrows were raised that Thompson – co-founder of the Austin branch of KIPP Charter Schools and a TFA

alum – suddenly wanted a spot on the AISD board. Thompson countered that this was less fox guarding the hen house than poacher turning gamekeeper.

And now, the revelation that LEE systematically supported his campaign with about 60 in-kind contributions – from software expenses to email costs to candidate coaching – has become fodder for the run-off.

Why would a D.C.-based 501(c)4 nonprofit get engaged in an Austin school district election? Thompson says it's simple: He's a TFA alum and a LEE member, and they take care of their own. "Leadership for Educational Equity is an organization made up of current and former teachers, educators, and leaders who care about educational equality." The group is not dedicated to any set policies, just to candidates who "are dedicated to putting kids first." There's one addendum: All those teachers, educators, and leaders are TFA alums.



RE-FORMING AI\$D CONTINUED FROM **P.30** AKF's de Man described LEE's relationship to TFA as like "an alumni society for a university." He should know. Before joining AKF, he was LEE's Texas regional director. Yet while LEE denies any ideological bent, its backers may have other ideas. In the last year, there have been only three donors to its Texas operation: Wal-Mart heir Steuart Walton, tech investor Arthur Rock, and former New York mayor Michael Bloomberg. All three are stalwarts of the "reform" movement, all three major advocates for the charter movement.

It's a similar story over at AKF. For the past two AISD board elections, their major donors have been Professional Janitorial Company owner and Republican donor Rex Gore, Silicon Labs co-founder David Welland, and former Dell CTO Eric Harslem (plus John Armbrust who gave \$1,000 in the last cycle). That trio alone has infused tens of thousands of dollars into an organization that wants to be a major player. Bahar-Engler, LEE Texas' treasurer and vice president of its D.C. office, was previously TFA's vice president of strategy.

Then there's Thompson's former employers at KIPP. At its highest level, the charter group and TFA are in bed together – literally. TFA founder and CEO Wendy Kopp is married to Richard Barth, president of KIPP. And that's where the real purpose of TFA and LEE becomes clear. In 2011, Kopp declared that TFA is a "leadership development organization, not a teaching organization." That makes LEE the next step in that leadership trail.

Yet there are undeniable differences between LEE and AKF. Moreover, it's hard to paint AKF's endorsed candidate list as strictly pro-charter, pro-reform. In 2012, it was easy, since they primarily backed the candidates that voted to hand Allan Elementary over to IDEA. This time, they're supporting Pace in the At-Large race, who is running on a platform of more aggressively countering charter recruitment of AISD stuBut Zarifis wonders how serious AKF was about backing Gordon. All told, the group dropped roughly \$40,000 into Wagner vs. Schneider, but only \$2,500 into Gordon's campaign. That's the same as they spent on Julie Cowan, although her District 4 win was a foregone conclusion. "Austin Kids First had minimal involvement in the Ted Gordon race, even though they endorsed him," said Zarifis. "While they have a lot of money, they haven't spent much to counter the out-of-state money coming into that race."

Ask de Man, and it's a question of priorities. First off, his group decided to take a knee in District 6. Then, considering that both Gordon and Cowan were sweeping the endorsements, and had the support of both AKF and Ed. Austin, it seemed that they were foregone conclusions – a conclusion that, at least in Gordon's race, he admits was woefully premature. That just left the At-Large Position 9, and District 7. "So that's why Yasmin got so much support."

BACKBONE AND BOILER ROOM

LEE and AKF: two seemingly separate entities - but the connecting tissue is Teach for America. LEE's stated aim is "empowering Teach for America corps members and alumni to grow as leaders in their communities and help build the movement for educational equity." Meanwhile, AKF was founded by TFA alumni Ben Maddox and Sean Flammer, and its current board is comprised of all TFA alums. Moreover, in 2012, when the group first appeared on the scene, it faced immediate accusations that it was little more than AstroTurf, a local variant of the near-identical Dallas Kids First, for which Maddox was a registered lobbyist (see "We're All About the ... Kids!" Oct. 19, 2012). Its leadership is uniformly TFA alumni, and with charter operators like Armbrust interviewing candidates, there are obvious links between AKF, LEE, charters, and the reform movement, all stretching back to TFA. Former Education Austin president, now secretary-treasurer for statewide teachers union Texas AFT, Louis Malfaro said. "Teach for America is the backbone, the hiring room, think tank, and boiler room for the charter movement."

The links run deep into the personnel. Prior to replacing Flammer and Maddox as AKF's head, de Man was TFA's recruitment director, its director of Alumni Affairs, and then Texas regional director for LEE. Beki dents. They even endorsed two of the same candidates as Education Austin: Gordon in District 1 and Julie Cowan in District 4.

Moreover, LEE and AKF found themselves on opposing sides in District 1. AKF formally endorsed Gordon, while LEE effectively ran its Texas office as a second campaign office for Thompson. Since midsummer, LEE hasn't spent a red cent in Texas except on Thompson. And this wasn't a one-off contribution. Instead, it was a series of small expenditures, from candidate training to email expenses and software costs.

REVOLVING BEDFELLOWS

Is this coincidence, or is there really some grand conspiracy? De Man is quick to defend his old bosses at LEE as strictly non-partisan. "Even when I worked there, I could not gauge my support for candidates according to some litmus test. If Hillary Procknow was a TFA alumnus, she'd get just as much support as D." He points to LEE's support for Los Angeles Unified School District board member Steve Zimmer: a TFA alumnus so opposed to charters and vouchers that Bloomberg et al. threw almost \$2 million at his opponent. Zimmer is "probably the most outspoken critic of the reform movement, but he got more support than D."

Political consultant Mark Littlefield met with or worked in an informal capacity with several candidates, including Cowan, Pace, and Paul Saldaña, and is actually a friend of Wagner's since high school. However, he was one of the big recipients of AKF cash, pulling in \$15,700 in consultancy fees. He countered any suggestion that the AKF endorsement came with any strings. 'Yasmin has no corporate reform agenda. Her agenda was: I'm a parent out here, and I never see Robert." As for LEE's involvement in District 1, he concurred with de Man's analysis, saying, "If any TFA person runs for a school board seat anywhere in America, they're going to back you with everything they've got, and that's their sole criteria. ... They don't have an interest in Austin, and would have backed [Thompson] if he ran in Round Rock or Portland. At least, that's what I'm hoping."

For some, LEE's presence is yet another sign that Austin is no longer a sleepy little college town, but a target of opportunity for reformers. Position 9 candidate Procknow said, "They're setting the stage right now. Austin looks like the kind of city they want to pick. There's a large minority population, it's a charter-friendly state, and there's a lot of money to be made."

Even in pro-reform Texas, vouchers face a powerful coalition of opponents: Democrats, who see them as backdoor privatization, and rural Republicans who fear that they would decimate their already struggling ISDs. However, many Democrats have been swayed by charter proponents' claims that they can cure all ills. Malfaro said, "I remember watching Wendy Davis just gush over [KIPP founder] Mike Feinberg. 'Oh, we know you guys know what you're doing, and you're doing it right.' But Feinberg more and more is opening up and admitting, 'Look, we don't know how to run a whole school district. We're not good at that. We're not even good at coming into a so-called failing school, a high-poverty school where kids aren't doing well because of the tests, and take the whole school over and turn it around." The end result, Zarifis said, is "big money doubling down on strategies that haven't really proven themselves out."

ACRONYMS EXPLAINED

Leadership for Educational Equity (LEE)

LEE (www.educationalequity.org) calls itself a "nonpartisan organization dedicated to empowering **Teach for America** corps members and alumni to grow as leaders in their communities and help build the movement for educational equity." With funding from various underwriters in the charter and "reform" movement, they provide local "leadership training" for community organizers or candidates, especially for school boards.

Teach for America (TFA)

The primary mission of TFA (www.teachforamerica.org) is to recruit recent college graduates and other professionals to teach for two years in urban and rural public schools; recently, through LEE and other efforts, the organization has focused on involvement with school district administrations (e.g., boards of trustees) and promoting both public and private charter schools. Austin Kids First (AKF) AKF (www.austinkidsfirst.org) describes itself as a "local, nonpartisan group of concerned citizens" whose mission is to "find, support, and elect great school board leaders." Although the organization's founders have connections to both the charter school movement and TFA, they insist their only mission is to elect board members who put "kids first." They engage voters both through their members and their political action committee - by far the largest source of campaign funding in the current election cycle.

KIPP Charter Schools

KIPP (www.kipp.org), the "Knowledge Is Power Program," is a national network of public charter schools, founded in Houston in 1995, self-described as "free, openenrollment, college-preparatory public schools dedicated to preparing students in underserved communities for success in college and life." There are several KIPP Austin schools (www.kippaustin.org), where teachers and students commit to longer instructional hours than in conventional public schools, including some Saturdays and a mandatory summer program. "All students, families, and teachers choose to commit to our rigorous program." Malfaro is concerned that groups like LEE become political spin machines. For Thompson, being able to say that he's been a K-12 teacher is a powerful plus in this election. But that's a claim any TFA-er can make, and Malfaro is dismissive of their classroom time being anything but résumé-polishing. "It's two years, and off to law school."

THE MONEY TRAIL

But AISD is pushing back. The first big sign that charters were not welcome was the cancellation of the contract with IDEA Public Schools to take over Allan Elementary and Eastside Memorial High. That's why these elections are so important. Malfaro described the current trustees as "the most progressive school board I've seen in the 20 years that I've been involved." That makes Austin "a flash point for the privatizers. But Austin is ground zero for the community schools movement." He points to the community-led Travis Heights in-district charter, and advocates like Allan Weeks, who created community coalitions to support, not supplant, public schools. He said, "That doesn't fit with [the reformers'] narrative that teachers are the problem, teachers' unions are the problem, tenure is the problem."

But again, why should LEE care about AISD? According to Zarifis, "Because we've been successful in drawing a line and saying we value public schools, neighborhoods schools. We value the families that go to those schools. We push back at charters coming into those schools. That type of success just riles the reformers up because that's not their vision. They want to sell public education to this charter and that charter, upend neighborhoods, and limit choice for kids."

District 6 run-off candidate Saldaña concurs. "I think part of it may be that they see some potential vulnerabilities in AISD," he said, noting that AISD has already lost over 2,000 families to charters. However, he added, with new trustees and a new superintendent, "We have an opportunity to turn the page, to create a new legacy, and one way we have to do that is create a better working relationship with the community and serving the needs of the neighborhood schools."

Moreover, Austin is ground zero for community resistance to what the charter movement has become. And it's that little twist – what the charter movement has become – that is so important. Originally, charters were supposed to be community-led engines for innovation. With a few of the bureaucratic leashes and tethers removed, schools could experiment, and then districts could apply what they had learned to all their schools. Instead, Malfaro argues, they've become Plan B for venture capitalists who thought they'd make a fortune off school vouchers. When communities nationwide turned vouchers into political poison, they changed tack. "Public education is this untapped opportunity for vendors of all kinds," said Malfaro.

All observers expect the battle to continue at the state level. Last session, Senate Education Committee Chair Dan Patrick pushed hard for both vouchers and an end to the cap on the number of charters. It's a foregone conclusion that, as lieutenant governor, he'll push even harder for the same targets. However, he'll face the same opposition he faced last time, both from Republicans and Democrats, as they seek to have charters held to the same accountability standards as public schools. Malfaro said, "If that happens, more charters will close, and it becomes a worse investment. You're going to see these investors pull out of charters. They're not doing this for some altruistic view of education. They're doing this to make money."

The Washington, D.C., restaurant Second State recently added an accessory to its bar menu – "hand-cut rock," i.e., "artisanal" ice, for \$1 extra (but free in premium drinks). The local supplier Favourite Ice assures that its frozen water contains no calcium to cloud it and, with a heavy-duty band-saw blade, "handcuts" 200-to-300-pound blocks into the cubes that ultimately wind up in the glass. A Favourite Ice founder said his frozen water resists drink-weakening longer than ordinary cubes do.

Weird Patriotism

November is tax-publicizing season in Finland, where, starkly unlike America, the government releases all individuals' tax records to help build public support for the country's vast welfare state. Thus, reported *Foreign Policy* magazine, Finnish society gets a "yearly dose of schadenfreude" ... "opening the door for a media frenzy of gossip, boasting and fingerpointing" about "fair share" and who's more worthy. A few, however, proudly pay high Finnish taxes as a "badge of patriotism," rejecting common tax shelters. "We've received a lot of help from society," said one homegrown (and wealthy) entrepreneur, "and now it is our turn to pay back."

"Offended!" (Tiptoeing in America)

Steve Soifer, CEO of an international support group for people with "shy bladders," excoriated DirecTV in November for its series of commercials featuring Rob Lowe, whose "awkward" character in one ad stands at a urinal and says, "Fact: I can't go with other people in the room." Soifer says the ad ridicules a serious problem – and compared it to

"making fun" of a man missing an arm or leg. The Power of One Sensitive Soul: 1) Lt. Col. Sherwood Baker was turned away from Adams High School in Rochester, Mich., in September by a guard who said a school official sent word that Baker was not allowed in to discuss his daughter's class schedule until he changed to civilian clothes – because "a student" might be offended by his military uniform. (The Rochester school superintendent later apologized.) 2) The British Embassy in Washington, D.C., apologized twice in August, first a tonguein-cheek "apology" for England's War of 1812 attack on the White House and then for making that "apology" in the first place – because of a backlash on Twitter from Americans complaining the jokey "apology" was "offensive."

Bright Ideas

David Van Vleet asked for certain supposedly public records in Tacoma, Wash., and was forced into federal court when the city turned him down. Van Vleet wanted data from the city licenses of strip club employees (dancers' stage and real names, date of birth, etc.) so that he could pray for them individually, by name, to make his appeals more effective. (In October, Judge Ronald Leighton denied Van Vleet a temporary restraining order against the city.)

Ewwww – Gross!

Daniela Liverani, 24, of Edinburgh, Scotland, and British singer Katie Melua recently survived inadvertent, grotesque ordeals hosting, respectively, a 3-inch leech and a spider. The leech had found its way into Liverani's nose during an Asian backpacking trip and had poked part-way out several times (though Liverani had assumed it was a nosebleed clot and "sniffed [it] back up"). When she finally saw a doctor in October, she said, the leech played peek-a-boo for a half-hour until the doctor grabbed it with tweezers. Melua's tiny spider apparently lived in her ear for a week, creating a constant "rustling" noise until her doctor vacuumed it out. She guessed that it came in through old earbud headphones on an airline flight. (Her spokesperson said the singer had no hard feelings and had released the spider into her garden.)

Chutzpah!

The law finally caught up, partially, to squatter Darrell Beatty in September, as he was charged with grand larceny for forging a deed to a home owned by Jennifer Merin, 70, in Laurelton, N.Y. However, he bailed out of jail on Oct. 22 and immediately returned to the house. In fact, Beatty's two sons had remained "at home" even while Beatty was locked up. The home has been in Merin's family since 1930. "Mind-boggling," she said.

The Law Works in Strange Ways: 1) The Gothamist news site reported in October that bicyclist John Roemer, who was rear-ended by a driver in Brooklyn in May (and whose intensivecare bill was paid by the driver's insurance company), is now being sued by the driver in small claims court for \$2,000 in damages to her car. 2) In November, a civil court in Lindau, Germany, ordered Rory Gray to pay Dr. Daniel Ubani for calling Ubani "an animal" (for having injected Gray's father with 10 times a drug's safe dose in 2008, which led to his death). The court found the epithet unwarranted and ordered Gray to help pay Ubani's legal expenses.

The owner of the world's largest corn maze (63 acres), at Cool Patch Pumpkins in Dixon, Calif., told Sacramento's KOVR-TV in October that "several" times this season, visitors have called 911 to come get them out of the maze. (Also, two months earlier, an emergency crew in Braintree, England, was forced to use special equipment to find and rescue an elderly woman who had fallen while inside the 10-acre Blake House Craft Centre maze.)

Cliches Come to Life: 1) In a \$460,000 police-brutality settlement with the city of Birmingham, Ala., in October, plaintiff Anthony Warren will receive \$1,000, with the rest going to his lawyers. (The unangelic Warren is serving 20 years for running over an officer during a high-speed car chase in 2008; he took a beating once officers caught him.) 2) Condemned California inmate Steven Homick, 74, finally took his last breath on Nov. 5 – more than 29 years after committing the two murders that put him on death row. However, Homick died of natural causes (the 65th condemned California man to go that way in the last 35 years).

LISA SCHEPS' CHRISTMAS GIFT TO THE LOCAL STAGE SCENE IS A NEW PERFORMANCE VENUE, GROUND FLOOR THEATRE **by Robert Faires**

For most people who have run a theatre of their own, once is enough. The unrelenting pressures of upkeep, facility management, bills, fundraising, and renters who are show people – who aren't exactly known for either their equanimity or economic stability – take a heavy toll, and when folks exit the business, they leave that door closed.

Not Lisa Scheps. Best known locally for her work in human rights advocacy and as producer-host of KOOP radio's *Off the Stage and on the Air*, this lifelong lover of the stage ran her own 100-seat venue, play! Theatre, from 2004 to 2007, but the challenges involved didn't sour her on the job. She's currently transforming an Eastside warehouse into a new 140-seat black box performance venue, Ground Floor Theatre.

Scheps' re-entry into the theatre biz was launched a few months ago during a conversation with ScriptWorks Executive Director Christina Moore and Hyde Park Theatre Artistic Director Ken Webster about theatre space in Austin – how tight it is now and how more theatres might be lost in the near future. Scheps had been hankering to produce again, this time focusing on what she calls "do-gooder theatre" – new works by and for underrepresented populations like communities of color, the LGBT community, and the differently abled. "I missed doing theatre," she says. "Doing the radio show is great – I love it, it's a real passion of mine – but it put me on the sidelines, and I wanted to get back into it." Her interest in rejoining the game with a fresh mission, the urgent need for venues, and Scheps' longstanding desire to help Austin's theatre community become more "cohesive" created what she calls "a perfect storm" of impulses to open another theatre: "I said, 'You know what? I'm ready to take a chance. I had some money from when my mother passed away, and I said, 'I'm just gonna go for it.'"

From that moment to Scheps signing the lease on the loading-dock warehouse on Springdale Road - part of a massive redevelopment of the old U.S. Food Service warehouse complex - was just two months. Scheps initially envisioned the 4,500-square-foot space as a jewel box theatre with proscenium, but when lighting designer/producer Natalie George was shown the space, she asked Scheps, "Why would you not make it a blackbox theatre?" Hearing that, Scheps knew that's what Ground Floor needed to be. Flanking the flexible playing space will be the entrance/ lobby with box office, and the backstage with dressing rooms, green room, and crossover hallway. The 24-foot ceiling offers ample room for lighting equipment – which Scheps snagged from eBay and a UT Department of Theatre & Dance auction - and, if Scheps has her way, eventually a balcony and bar.

For now, though, Scheps just wants to get the space finished out sufficiently for its debut event, the Fusebox Festival 60 in Sixty fundraiser on Tuesday, Dec. 9. Scheps allows that the space will still be "very warehouse-y" then, but promises that by mid-January, when it has its first real run as a venue for the FronteraFest Long Fringe, Ground Floor Theatre will be complete.

Scheps' efforts have earned enormous support from her peers and colleagues, with unsolicited pleas on her behalf from theatre artist/ blogger Travis Bedard and the youth of ImprovEd Shakespeare, plus enough donations to fund a \$30,000 Kickstarter campaign. "I didn't know what kind of response I was going to get," Scheps says. "When I started doing this, I reached out to as many people as I had time to. I really wanted buy-in from the community, because I see what I'm doing as not only servicing the rest of the theatre community, but the rest of the *theatres*. By having this, I'm going to help Salvage Vanguard and Hyde Park and all those others."

Scheps is grateful for the theatre community's backing and the interest from companies eager to produce in the space, but asks for patience: "I was listening to an interview with Jon Stewart, and he was talking about the film he just did, and he said, 'You know, I don't know what I don't know.' And I don't know what I don't know. There's so much stuff that I just did, and there are going to be some growing pains." Fitting for someone whose motto has always been "Jump off the cliff, and sprout wings on your way down."

But at least this time Scheps isn't sprouting them alone; Patti Neff-Tiven will help run Ground Floor. "The biggest thing I learned from play! Theatre was that I suck at development," says Scheps. "I need help with that. I'm also not a detail person. I'm a big-picture person. That's why I have Patti." It takes a village to run a theatre, and with all the assistance she's receiving, maybe Scheps' second time around will last a long, long time.



Well-Behaved? Let's Assume Not.

This fall's nonfiction releases spotlight women who made history

Little did Laurel Thatcher Ulrich know when she penned a paper for *American Quarterly* in 1976 that one line in it would wend its way out of that academic journal and into the culture at large, appearing on bumper stickers, T-shirts, and coffee mugs, and across the Web, attributed to everyone from Marilyn Monroe to Eleanor Roosevelt to Anne Boleyn. But something about her phrase – *Well-behaved women seldom make history* – was just too concise, too smart, too *true*, to be confined to scholarly studies. It was meant for the world to hear and absorb and repeat. And its resonance can be felt again in several new nonfiction titles that recount the stories of women who changed the world. Whether they were warriors, writers, fashion designers, suffragists, advocates for women's reproductive rights, star-spangled superheroes, or book editors, they made history, and how they did is worth learning about in more detail. Surely one here would make a perfect gift for the history-making woman or women in your life (or maybe that man who ought to know more history than he does.) - *Robert Faires*

PENELOPE FITZGERALD: A LIFE by Hermione Lee; Knopf, 512pp., \$35

Hermione Lee's meticulous biography paints a stunning portrait of a charming yet enigmatic writer who was able to realize a dream deferred.

Penelope Fitzgerald bore all the marks of a great talent in her early years. The clever, literary daughter of a historically significant British family (her uncle Dillwyn Knox was an Enigma codebreaker, while her father E.V. Knox was the editor of *Punch*, the influential colonial-era humor magazine) wrote of her time at Oxford, "We didn't feel the need to study modern literature, we imagined we were going to write it." Yet it would be nearly four decades – with a world war, a bad marriage, three children, and a long stretch of home-lessness and abject poverty in between – before that imagining would become a reality.

What's striking about Fitzgerald's story is not that she published her first novel at age 60 or won the 1979 Booker Prize for *Offshore*, which mined a particularly bleak era during which she and her drunken, disbarred husband lived with their children on a dilapidated barge on the Thames. Rather, it's that Fitzgerald's creative spark was never extinguished by her circumstances – it was just back-burnered to the vagaries of life, related in painstaking, if uneven, detail by her biographer.

While Lee's methodology is on point, the opening chapters are a maddening tangle of names and vague personal pronouns, effectively burying her topic in a heap of clumsy prose. Lee shines in her thoughtful analyses of Fitzgerald's novels, bringing details from her subject's life into relief in enlightening and poignant ways, while retellings elsewhere of tangential details bog down the narrative.

In this way, Lee could have used a bit of her subject's economy of language. Then again, saying in a few lines what others take pages to say was one of Fitzgerald's rare talents. – *Melanie Haupt*

JOAN OF ARC: A LIFE TRANSFIGURED by Kathryn Harrison Doubleday, 400pp., \$28.95 A sweeping undertak-

ing of massive proportion didn't restrain the spirit of the Maid of Orlèans, nor does it seem to have intimidated Kathryn Harrison. Arguing that each generation must redefine Joan of Arc for its own era, this author of seven novels; a true crime book; a memoir;

essay collections; and a biography of Saint Thérèse of Lisieux (who herself authored "pious re-creations," or skits, of scenes from Joan of Arc's life which were performed among nuns), set out to do just that. Harrison isn't alone in her curiosity; the unlikely story of Joan of Arc has fueled conjecture and interest for centuries, with the result of inspired works from the likes of Shakespeare and Voltaire to Mark Twain and George Bernard Shaw. It is in an overview of artists' interpretations, Joan's letters, known historic fact, and "centuries of scholarly and critical interpretation" that Harrison seeks her new muse. It all melds together in a conversational, somewhat chatty tone that occasionally works against her. Casual, sometimes incongruous references to works such as Cecil B. DeMille's 1916 silent epic: several comparisons to Jesus, in the form of direct guotes; and the tendency to assign mischievous behavior in passages such as "Without [King] Charles' permission to mobilize, it was all the fighting [Joan] could



MERYLE SECREST

ELSA SCHIAPARELLI: A BIOGRAPHY

by Meryle Secrest; Knopf. 400pp., \$35

Meryle Secrest would never get mistaken for a novelist. There are sections of *Elsa Schiaparelli: A Biography* that shift abruptly from trot to gallop, then suddenly stumble on an odd bit of description. There are sections that befuddle after several re-readings and more that inspire audible groans. It's an infuriating way to read a book, sure. We still bet you'll ride until the end.

What Secrest lacks in style is more than made up for her seemingly infallible instinct in choosing worthwhile subjects. Hers is certainly not the first biography of Schiaparelli, but its painstaking research does a good job of sussing out truth. "Schiap" was a self-invention, and previous accounts relied a little too much on that fiction. Although obviously quite taken with the legend, Secrest nonetheless cuts through the miasma.

Two accounts particularly stand out. What little was known about William de Wendt de Kerlor, Schiaparelli's husband,

was mostly from the daughter who never really knew him (de Kerlor abandoned the family when Gogo was one) and Schiap herself. Secrest cuts him down to size (literally in the case of his height) as a sometime incompetent grifter. It's truly shocking to read an account of a woman culture regards as a trailblazer standing by that man. More shocking is Secrest's telling of Schiaparelli's movements during the war years. Although the biographer never points a definitive finger, she's accumulated quite a bit of evidence to suggest that Schiaparelli was a collaborator. For those who position Schiap as a sort of anti-Chanel, both in design and in spirit, it's an awakening. Despite all this, one can see more of Schiaparelli's personality in the threads of her Lesage embroideries than in Secrest's text. The photos spread throughout tell a different story, one Secrest barely touches on. Schiaparelli was a fashion designer, but Secrest barely mentions the actual designs. And that is why the name still endures.

For those obsessed with Schiaparelli's designs, seeing how experience worked its way into an exquisite cape would have been a bonus. Neophytes won't mind at all the montage version. - Brandon Watson

get away with ...," all feel offered up as part of a fabric of truth. Like any reinterpretation of fact, whether faith-based and murky or contemporary dramatization, when artistic conceit is done well, it makes for a dishy read, and to Harrison's credit, footnotes aplenty attempt to ground us in fact as opposed to fiction. The engaging text, combined with a generous array of color plates and photos, engrosses like a good Hallmark Channel made-for-television movie, which makes it perfect for holiday reading. – Anne Harris

JACQUELINE BOUVIER KENNEDY ONASSIS: THE UNTOLD STORY by Barbara Leaming Thomas Dunne Books, 368pp., \$27.99

QUELIN BOUVIER KENNEDY ONASSIS The United Story BARBARA LEAMING

Anyone old enough to remember the assassina-

tion of John F. Kennedy 51 years ago this month also recalls the calm, quiet strength that the newly widowed first lady exhibited during the hours, days, and years that followed.

Hold that thought.

This long-held public image of the first lady's classy forbearance is incorrect, Barbara Leaming tells us in *Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy Onassis: The Untold Story*.


Indeed, Learning lifts the veil of this perfect picture of stoicism and reveals an altogether different portrait – one of a popular fashion icon who was left emotionally paralyzed for decades after witnessing her husband's murder that November day in Dallas.

This is Leaming's third Kennedy-related book, the first since 2001's *Mrs. Kennedy: The Missing History of the Kennedy Years*, which critics faulted for its unfounded assumptions. In *The Untold Story*, however, Leaming drills deeper, drawing on letters, diary entries, and other documents to conclude that Kennedy presented all the symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder.

Kennedy's condition went undiagnosed for years; it was, after all, before PTSD was recognized as a medical condition, before its symptoms – sleepnessness, fear, anger, suicidal thoughts, and any number of "triggers" that provoke unpredictable behavior – were seen in soldiers returning from Vietnam. And PTSD wasn't officially identified as a psychiatric disorder until 1980.

The early part of Learning's book fails to impress as the author rehashes Jacqueline





Bouvier's early years, her ambitions, and her ambiguous courtship with a rising political star, whose skirt-chasing habits Jackie believed she could change. Only when the president and his wife are in Dallas do the pages begin to turn more vigorously. That's when we start to comprehend the psychological toll the murder took on the first lady. Sitting next to her husband in the back of a limousine, surely she must have heard the "loud thump, like a melon exploding on a pavement," when the third shot ripped into her husband's head, causing "... brain and bone matter [to rain] on Jackie's hair, face, and clothes." From there, we glean new details about the PTSD survivor's long, tormented life: the self-medicating with vodka; the sudden, inexplicable outbursts; her thoughts of suicide; and the idea that her children would be better off without her.

Notably missing from this account are the enormous effects Jackie's PTSD must have had on her two children, but perhaps Learning is saving those details for her next Kennedy book. - Amy Smith



THE SECRET HISTORY OF WONDER WOMAN by Jill Lepore; Knopf, 432pp., \$29.95

Suffering Sappho! Athena's Shield! Not Ron Burgundy's exclamations these, but curses approved for use in Wonder Woman comics as revealed in The Secret History of Wonder Woman, Jill Lepore's study of America's favorite Amazon. Lepore, a Harvard professor and staff writer for The New Yorker, reveals a lot more than catchphrases here, however, A book about Wonder Woman's origins can't help but be about the man who created her, William Moulton Marston, and a book about Marston can't help but be a bit scandalous.

While Marston's predilection for bondage can be seen by anyone perusing a Golden Age Wonder Woman comic (hardly an issue fails to include the use of chains or other bindings), it's Lepore's astoundingly thorough research that illuminates Marston's pre-comics career and carefully concealed private life. He appears here under many guises: staunch self-proclaimed feminist, tireless huckster promoting the lie detector of his own invention, domineering but loving polygamist family man, a bit of a creep.

The Secret History spends surprisingly little time documenting Wonder Woman's career in comics, but only because Lepore's interest is in all the details that added up to the character's creation. When relating Marston's exposure to the suffragette movement while studying at Harvard, Lepore takes time to track the popularity of Amazon mythology in feminist fiction of the time. She notes Marston's failure to get lie-detector results admitted into evidence in a murder trial so she can point to the significance of a WW story in which the Lasso of Truth (the Amazonian lariat that compels all who touch it to 'fess up) is used to great effect in a courtroom. Photos of Olive Byrne, one of Marston's two wives, are included so readers themselves might note the similarity between her silver bracelets and the bullet-deflecting ones Wonder Woman wears.

Plenty of salacious stories are detailed within - yes, Marston and his wives participated in a "cult of female sexual power," and one chapter is titled "The Baby Party," which is as weird as one imagines – but The Secret History's most delightful surprises are tamer: Lepore's in-depth account of the rise of the birth control movement and the windows into the lives of Marston's wives, Sadie Elizabeth Holloway and Olive Byrne, both criminally overshadowed by their bombastic husband. Wonder Woman's road to the status of feminist icon is a bumpy one, but Lepore proves, through admirable scholarship and witty prose, that it is a history worth uncovering.

SMALL VICTORIES: SPOTTING **IMPROBABLE** MOMENTS OF GRACE by Anne Lamott **Riverhead Books**, 304pp., \$29.95 Though I only met

author Anne Lamott briefly at a writing con-

ference 20 years ago, I've often had the sense that she was writing to me personally. Perhaps that's because divine providence seems to put a particularly apt collection of her essays into my hands just when it can be the most useful and enlightening. So it was with her newest book. Small Victories: Spotting Improbable Moments of Grace, which hit my inbox a few short weeks after the death of my treasured younger sister. Once again, Lamott unknowingly shared balm for the pain of a stranger with wise perceptions about the process of grieving and glimmers of light for the path through it to comfort. In "Ladders," she explains the necessity of actually experiencing grief in order to heal, illuminating the nature of the situation with the metaphor of a lazy Susan

- "one day it is heavy and underwater and the next day it spins and stops at loud and rageful, and the next day at wounded keening, and the next day at numbness, silence." I found amazing solace in the fact that someone else had such acute comprehension of my recent emotional state.

The essays also offer prime examples of Lamott's crystalline insights and wicked wit. There are laugh-out-loud moments, as in the hilariously brave "Matches," which includes the description of how a CPAP machine can transform an intimate relationship from "an experience similar to sleeping next to a dying silverback gorilla into something like sleeping next to an aquarium," and frank revelations about her personal brand of "left-wing Christianity," that sound a clarion call to social activism rather than sanctimonious judgment. It is so good to hear from her again.

Last week, the New York Metropolitan Transit Authority announced a public service campaign to discourage "man spreading" on public transportation. For those of you who have never lived in a city with public transit (thanks again, Austin voters!), this is the pernicious habit some men have of taking up more than their fair share of space by spreading their legs as far apart as possible. Following the announcement, women, long accustomed to being told to shut our legs, seized the opportunity to berate man-spreaders on social media; men claimed anatomical necessity; chaos ensued.

Searching for adjudication on this vital issue, I turned to my trusty copy of **Charm**, an advice manual written in 1928 by **Margery Wilson** and passed down through four generations of women in my family. Wilson comes down hard on sprawling: "We have seen sprawlers who were not ungraceful," she concedes with an extraordinary effort at fairness, but ultimately concludes that "as sprawling always denotes indiffer-



ence, it is neither courteous nor gracious, does not show polite interest in those near, and is theretofore not kind in its inference."

Margery Wilson was a silent film actress and director. Though most often remembered for her role in D.W. Griffith's **Intolerance**, Wilson directed four motion pictures of her own, including an adaptation of the typographically rich self-help novel **That Something** by William W. Woodbridge. (Here is a typical bit of dialogue: 'Who are you?' I asked. "I am 'THAT SOMETHING,' came the reply." "But where are you?" "I am hidden in your soul.") After marrying a rancher who wanted her to retire from pictures, Wilson started her own self-help cottage industry via a series of radio broadcasts on charm, which she defined as "the technique of pleasing others while you

maintain your own dignity and build your situation to your own liking."

A faded green book stamped with a golden art deco gazelle, *Charm* was a source of endless fascination to me in my youth. Its inner cover bears the following inscription: "With love to her 'charming' granddaughters, from Grandmother – June, 1985 – P.S. My mother gave this to me when I was a teenager!"

That inscription raised questions that haunt me to this day. First of all, why didn't my mother get Charm? Why did it skip a generation? Second, why did my sister and I get it so early, despite the postscript specifying adolescence as the appropriate time? In 1985, I was 7 and my sister 9. Did my mother present a hopeless case, and did my sister and I represent a new hope for whose advent my grandmother was desperately impatient? Or, as I suspected, was it the opposite - had my mother skimmed through the contents of *Charm* once at the age of 15. memorized everything between its covers, and handed it right back after acing the exam? Did my sister and I, in fact, receive it early because we needed all the extra time we could get?

I never asked. It was the nature of our family to be frank with expressions of love and vague on the rest of the human condition. At any rate, after 10 minutes of squabbling over which one of us would read *Charm* first (we were strictly forbidden to read any book at the same time, just as we were forbidden to claim the red glass two nights in a row, or quit any game, no matter how long and boring, before it was finished), my mother confiscated *Charm* and put it away, concluding drily that we were apparently "too young." When it reappeared on the shelf years later, I was disappointed to find it not even mildly pornographic.

At any rate, I'm old enough now, and I've been feeling guilty for veering far from my original mandate as a style columnist, so this week I re-read *Charm* from cover to cover in order to distill its best secrets for you, beloved readers:

1) "There is nothing so refreshing, restful and revitalizing as to brush the body all over briskly with a dry brush the first thing in the morning or before a pre-dinner bath." Every horse agrees!

2) "It is our place to bend and smooth, to refresh, to amuse, to rest, to inspire." Translation: Make the bed every morning; take a nap every afternoon.

3) "Don't ever be caught trying to be attractive or to look pretty. Better to be frankly ugly." Translation: Being a lady is extremely complicated. Hence all the naps.

4) "We should not return a compliment in kind at the time. Let the complimenter have his little triumph of giving." Note the Machiavellian thrill in the second sentence.

5) "Walk about the room on tiptoe making large circles with the arms." Try it at your next dinner party!


6) "Have you ever watched the breathing of

people listening to something that was fascinating and absorbing to them? It is as though they were inhaling the perfume of a dewy rose in a June garden. A gentle, delicate, long breath that seems to reach well up into the forepart of the head, as though the wish were there to keep a current of that delightful atmosphere passing over the sensitive membranes that register its fragrance." Okay, I take it

back about there not being anything remotely pornographic about this book.

7) "Stand right where you are, realize your own power, fill your heart with infinite love and kindness, then with an eye singled on your goal nothing can hinder you." Translation: Buy more of my books!

People did. Wilson's self-help career spanned 60 years, outlasting three marriages and ending with her death in 1986, a year after my grandmother gave me her book. For a woman who directed her own films and found a way to influence the world even after her first husband forced her to quit, charm must have felt like something of a superpower. It allowed her to get where she was going without ever seeming to take up too much space on the subway.

Cyra-notable

Rostand's homely hero earns a handsome production from Austin Shakespeare BY ELISSA RUSSELL

Rivaling the intensity and diverse offerings of Cyrano de Bergerac is a feat not easily achieved. This play is the 1890s equivalent of a summer blockbuster, featuring beautiful verse as the framework for an enthralling tale that intermingles

war, comedy, and what is arguably one of the more tragic love triangles ever penned. Based loosely on the life of the 17th century French dramatist of the same name, Edmond Rostand's fictionalization follows its title character through duel after duel – be it literal sword fight, verbal sparring, or his constant struggle to be recognized for more than his unfortunately

large nose. From battles afield to battles of wit, Austin Shakespeare's production, under the commendable direction of Ann Ciccolella, effectively showcases the many charms of this fine piece of theatre.

It takes a big presence to don the big nose, and the inimitable Marc Pouhé exudes the same finesse in the role that Cyrano displays with his sword. Pouhé, however,

does not suffer the same misfortune as his character - that is, overlooking him is never an option. As is typically the case with an actor in a title role, much of the production's overall impact rests on Pouhé's shoulders. Those who saw him bear a similar load when plaving Othello in Austin Shakes' production last February will be unsurprised that he once again rises to the occasion, displaying his immense skill with verse as well as his incredible versatility as a performer.

Crucial to a provoking Cyrano is Roxane, Cyrano's cousin and love interest, played by the talented Amber Quick. It's evident

why Cyrano would fall for this radiant Roxane: Quick brings a natural charisma to the role, injecting charm and energy into each of her scenes, deftly handling both comic and dramatic moments. Her likability paired with Pouhé's passion makes

it all the more heart-wrenching when this Beauty and the Beast-esque tale doesn't have a Disney ending. Because, beautiful though his love for Roxane may be, poor Cyrano's homely outward appearance simply falls short in comparison to the handsome cadet. Christian (Keith Paxton). Upon learning of Roxane and Christian's

love for each other, and that Christian wishes to woo her but lacks the wit to do so, Cyrano agrees to write letters to Roxane on Christian's behalf. Paxton's performance in this scene expertly captures Christian's inner conflict and suspicions of Cyrano's intentions, while laying the groundwork for the play's famous balcony scene (maybe not the one you're thinking of). That scene - a standout

moment as written, but especially in this production - was far and away a personal favorite, highlighting the supreme skill of these three actors as Cyrano prompts Christian with the perfect poetry to win the woman they both love, entrancing Roxane and audience alike.

Unlike Cyrano himself, the production elements are quite handsome. Leslie Ann Turner's set design, consisting largely of projections onto a backdrop, enhances each scene while allowing for seamless transitions. While William Meadows' sound design is fitting, it sometimes proved a tad distracting during the production's tenser moments.



As is generally the case with Austin Shakespeare, Talena Martinez's gorgeous costumes crossed the t's in this production, while her wigs dotted the i's. And of course, Cyrano would be nothing if not for Tara Cooper's believable prosthetic nose work.

At the play's tear-jerking conclusion, the ill-fated Cyrano bemoans his misfortune, proclaiming that "it is [his] life to be the prompter everyone forgets." Austin Shakespeare's production, however, is far from forgettable.



THE SARAJEVO HAGGADAH **Bass Concert Hall, UT campus** Nov. 19

We all know that a good book can transport its reader, but what about the story of the book? The Sarajevo Haggadah is a manuscript with a fascinating history: It was made in medieval Spain, survived the 1492 Inquisition, ended up in Venice, then Sarajevo. The book was then spared twice more in recent times: first from the Nazis in World War II and then from shelling during the 1990 Bosnian War – both times preserved, interestingly, by Muslim librarians. Accordionist and composer Merima Ključo crafted an accordion-and-piano score that loosely traces this book's torrid yet miraculous journey.

The Haggadah's history holds particular resonance for Ključo, a Bosnian refugee from the 1990 conflict. The layers of parallelisms intertwined in this production were satisfyingly rich. The story contained in the Haggadah itself - the liturgical text for the Passover seder recounts the story of the Jewish exodus from Egypt. Is this production a story of the Jewish people leaving Egypt, or of their latter expulsion of Spain? Or of the book's journey across Europe? Or of Ključo's flight from Bosnia?

The concert began with a long silence - the sound of the "nothing" before the creation of the Earth. Then the accordion's bellows began to breathe, signaling the genesis of the creative work itself. In this opening section, the sensitivity of both Ključo and pianist Seth Knopp was, in a word, transcendent. The duo then wove through regional folk styles that evoked the book's past, such as Sephardic melodies and Bosnian song. Ključo was particularly brilliant with the Klezmer-style music, which somehow

managed to have both precise and carefree rhythms, and a great sense of sardonic humor. Then the music shifted to the war theme, signified by a relentlessly violent section of rumbling low piano with tight dissonances, which Knopp played with power and incision. The music alternated between these folk and conflict elements until it finally resolved into a peaceful send-off. Throughout the performance, the fierce concentration of both players was palpable, especially in the silences between sections.

Ključo collaborated with video artist Bart Woodstrup to create animations for the production. Many of them were taken directly from the Haggadah's illuminations, vivified with subtle movement. The video was elegant in the opening creation section, as the forms slowly evolved from a simple line into the colorful world replete with plants and animals. In the latter part of the work, however, some of the video elements were jarring and contrived; the images of marching Nazis and the historical photograph of the librarian jolted the experience into the specifics of a history lecture - counter to the metaphysical space that the musicians had so stunningly created.

The Haggadah itself is a testament to the power of coexistence; so many diverse people over centuries helped to protect this book, which was created in Spain's Convivencia. a period of relative harmony among Jews, Muslims, and Christians. Ključo describes the climate in Bosnia pre-conflict as a similarly open period for cross-cultural exchange. This artistic work was an appropriate culmination of this wonderful object - its rebirth and transposition into vet another presentation of the exodus narrative. The compelling performance was equal parts music and prayer: May we return to convivencia, amen. - Natalie Zeldin

What is it like to be alive in this world, in this time and place? There's the external surround we all have to deal with and of course it varies from location to location, even these days, regardless of how much each country, each neighborhood, is slowly turning, chain-storewise, into what my wife likes to call Generica.

Capturing that environment, evoking with precision and vibrancy both the human-built and the unfabricated world, is one way an artist can address our current existence. And then there's that old terra incognita, the interiority of us, which can be rendered to some extent along the lines of common ground –

The way in which people experience the world – the ways in which they react to it – when expressed with determination, that's what we call art.

That's what Andrea Heimer is doing, and you can witness the results of this determination on the walls of Yard Dog Art Gallery, in the artist's current "Folk and Dagger" exhibition.

"Through quietly observing the lives around her" says the exhibition statement, referring to the 33-year-old artist's childhood in Great Falls, Mont., "Heimer was able to piece together neighborhood tales of madness, conspiracy, and love, often substituting her own theories into any missing pieces of the story ... Part allegory, part autobiography, her crudely rendered but tremendously detailed paintings depict scenes of heartbreak, madness, and the emotional claustrophobia that comes with living in a tightly knit neighborhood."

Yeah, you ain't kidding. Whereas some visual art is called "narrative" even though it's nonsequential – and it's called that because the static image so vividly suggests unique events leading up to and away from the scene depicted – Heimer's is called "narrative" because: 1) it fits the definition just given; and 2) what else could you call paintings with titles like *On Snow Days We Sneaked Over to the Rich People's Hill and Used Their* Snow for Battle and Around June 1987 the Blacks' Summer Party Was Interrupted by a Broken Water Pipe, the Cause of Which Was Contested for Years?

This is some powerful stuff here, this depiction of the complex human interactions of suburbia, rendered in a manner (and with a level of autodidactic skill) that falls somewhere between the creations of the Reverend Howard Finster and Grandma Moses. The way it delves into and chronicles the warped mythos of a particular place, ah ... "Dude, it's totally David Lynch," I hear some bro in my head commenting. But no; rather, these neighborhood intrigues - so distinct, so strange, and yet so familiar - are reminiscent of those braided bits of Kelly "Magic for Beginners" Link stories that anchor that author's flights of fancy to the real world and create genre-transcendent literary brilliance.

And right there's a fine and edifying day's activities for you in *this* neighborhood, reader: Since Yard Dog is on South Congress, you could pay a long visit to the gallery (there's more to see there than just Heimer's wall-mounted anthropologies), then head to nearby BookPeople and grab you a copy of some Kelly Link collection.



DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

The Pumphouse Museum in Hidalgo does more than just document the stages of the Industrial Revolution. The brick and corrugated-tin walls bear the rust of nearly a century; inside the story of the people unfolds.

Built in 1909, the steam engines and pipes as tall as a man were brought in on the first railroad tracks. The waters of the Rio Grande nourished the newly planted citrus orchards and vegetable fields. Cheap labor from south of the border made it all possible.

The last of the towering smokestacks pinpoints the museum's location near the international bridge. A flood in 1933 moved the Rio Grande half a mile away and a channel dug to bring water to the pump station is now a small lake.

Once a marvel of technology, the mighty engines that lifted millions of gallons of water to fill the irrigation canals fell silent in 1983. Through photographs and artifacts, the museum tells the human and mechanical story of the development of the Rio Grande Valley.

The park surrounding the pumphouse has been designated as one of nine World Birding Centers in the Valley. In the shadow of the rust-colored border fence, the garden attracts an array of butterflies and birds.

The Hidalgo Pumphouse Museum is at 902 S. Second St. in the Viejo Hidalgo district. The museum is open Monday through Friday from 10am to 5pm. The park is open every day. For more info, call 956/843-8686 or go to www.cityofhidalgo.net/pumphouse.html.

THE BEER MILE KEEPS TRACK AND FIELD WEIRD

Drink a beer, run a lap, repeat three more times, and hope not to hurl. It's called the Beer Mile, and the first-ever world champion will be crowned this week at Yellow Jacket Stadium.

This endurance test of legs and livers began in the late Eighties as a way for college athletes to blow off steam, but over time the Internet has brought the cult tradition to a much wider audience. The sport now has a governing body (www.beermile.com), official set of rules, and a verified ranking of the fastest racers of all time.

It may sound like a joke, but the runners aren't kidding around. This year, former twotime NCAA 5,000m champion James "The Beast" Nielsen set a new world record of 4:57. You read that correctly, four beers and four laps in under five minutes.

The Beast won't be running in Austin, but the elite field of

athletes competing for a \$2,500 prize includes everyone from Olympians like Nick Symmonds to Austinite Chris

Kimbrough, a mother of six who recently set the women's record at 6:28 while drinking Hops & Grain Alt-eration.

The malty German-style Altbier isn't a typical choice for the beer mile. Most runners go with Budweiser because the lower carbonation is easier on the stomach, but official rules state that anything over 5%

THE ANNOUNCEMENTS FOR Apis Restaurant & Apiary (23526 Hwy. 71 W.) piqued our interest, so we drove out before Wine & Swine on Sunday. Chef-owner Taylor Hall and beekeeper Keith Huddle were about to start the first honey harvest from the 20 hives for

which the restaurant is named. Hall plans to use some of the 500 pounds of honey

harvested this fall in menu items and craft cocktails. In addition to a large garden, the property includes a two-story restaurant building, a smaller venue for private parties, and a well house. Apis isn't scheduled to open until early 2015, but Hall will present two popup dinners at the Oasis

Brewing facility (6550

Comanche Trail) on Tuesday and Wednesday, Dec. 16 & 17. Make reservations at 512/436-8918 or email at bee@apisrestaurant.com.

ABV is fair game, as long as it doesn't feature performance-enhancing packaging like "super mega mouth cans" or "vortex bottles." Coincidentally, Hops & Grain have signed on as a sponsor of the event and developed a beer specifically for the race.

"It's a German-style blond ale, very similar to a Kölsch, but we added a small amount of dry-hopping to give the beer a spicy hop character and a clean, crisp finish. Perfect for chugging on a track," says Hops & Grain owner Josh Hare.

Spectators at Yellow Jacket Stadium will be able to try the beer for themselves, as well as enjoy fresh-squeezed beverages from Juice Austin and sandwiches from Burro Cheese Kitchen.

The event is organized by Flocasts, a local media company that has found a niche

producing online broadcasts of underrepresented sports like track, wrestling, and gymnastics. Although these sports have a core dedicated audi-

ence, competitions like track meets are long and have lots of downtime, making them a tough sell to spectators. Adding beer helps, and Flocasts co-founder Mark Floreani hopes the lesson can be applied more broadly.

"If you've been at a track meet all day, rarely do you leave saying 'that's amazing.' For the Beer Mile we're trying to push the envelope on

production to make it more fun, and hopefully we learn something about having a good time that we can bring to real track meets."

In addition to testing the strength of their stomachs, much of what draws elite athletes to compete is this increased exposure for their sport.

"You can't compare Beer Mile to the running I do professionally at all - it's apples and oranges," says Symmonds. "That said, I really support anything that helps bridge the gap between our sport and popular culture."

The men's and women's elite races are the main event, but amateurs are invited to participate in the Open Mile category, and several local tech and running companies will be proving their sense of humor by participating in the four-man corporate relay.

Despite the serious athleticism involved, Floreani admits that there's definitely a NASCAR element to the event: most fans are really there to see the crash, or in this case, the hurl. – Dan Gentile

The Bitter and the Sweet

How Delysia Chocolatier built their brand

A year before Nicole Patel finally opened the chocolate factory of her dreams, she found herself sitting on the floor of an unfinished 2,000-square-foot space sobbing. Patel and her husband had purchased two contiguous condos in a rural northwest Travis County business park in which to create a workspace where Nicole could continue to grow her artisan chocolate business. On the day she was reduced to tears, she had just discovered that her chosen contractor had falsified bids and contracts and done careless, shoddy work where he did any work at all. The man and his tools had now disappeared. The project was behind schedule and over-budget. Patel had to start all over.

Once she had faced the unpleasant facts and had a good cry, the former Motorola and Freescale engineer realized

that if she wanted the contracting job done to her specifications, she might as well do it herself. So with some input from her father, retired civil engineer and Air Force Colonel Joseph Rippole, and the generous guidance of some

folks at the city of Cedar Park's Planning and Development Department, Patel forged on. She took the design she'd created with the help of her brother, New York designer and branding expert Joey Rippole, and saw the chocolate factory project through to completion.

Nicole Patel celebrated the opening of the Delysia Chocolate Culinary Center on Oct. 19, 2014. She welcomed family, friends, customers, and members of the media to tour the new home of her 6-year-old company, Delysia Chocolatier. The new factory includes a lobby for product sales and customer pickup, a conference room complete with audio-visual equipment for client meetings and consultations, and a sleek and efficient kitchen where all the chocolate magic happens. There are portable tempering machines and warmers, plenty of refrigerated and dry storage space, plus a staging area for packing and shipping with a convenient loading dock. She now employs two regu-

lar part-time staff people, interns from area cooking schools, and some freelance food bloggers who are helping to create a social media presence for the Delysia brand.

Now that the new facility is in operation, Patel says the business "has really taken on a life of its own. So much has happened so fast – we really needed to re-group and make sure we were all on the same page."

She readily admits that taking Delysia from a home hobby to a fullfledged brand with its own custom production facility involved a very steep learning curve, especially without any previous food-service or retail experience. "There were so many things," she recalls. "In the beginning I didn't even realize how much I didn't know, and I'm not just talking about the contracting,"

she says with a rueful laugh. "Things like figuring out whether to sell retail or online, how to develop a web presence, and learning how to interact with customers. But the biggest thing I hadn't anticipated was how to keep everything in balance, like spending time with my family, managing employees, developing products, promoting the business, making sales. It's been quite an adjustment."

Patel seems to have managed the learning curve pretty well. Delysia is flourishing as the holiday season approaches. The truffles, barks, molded chocolates, and drink mixes in the Delysia line are all products of Patel's imagination. The exquisite truffles come in various assortments, and each flavor is decorated with its own distinctive edible chocolate transfer. Actually making the chocolates is exacting work that requires concentration and attention to detail. Because so much of the business takes place online, Patel values any opportunity for personal interaction with consumers. She finds participating in community culinary events is not only good for product promotion, but for staff validation, as well. "I make it a point to take staff members and interns along when we do promotional events so they get to experience the 'wow' when customers enjoy something we've worked so hard to create," she explains.

That "wow" factor this season comes in the form of a milk chocolate salted caramel truffle (the company's bestseller) and the Holiday Truffle Collection (\$25) - nine pieces in three different flavors; gingerbread, mint, and eggnog. Patel says the eggnog truffles and bags of eggnog bark (\$5) have something of an annual cult following among certain clients. When queried about how they are made, all she will divulge is that the proprietary formula includes white chocolate, eggnog ingredients, and nutmeg. She says the best introduction to her product line is probably the Signature Truffle Collection (\$25), a nine-piece selection with milk chocolate, dark chocolate, caramel, honey, raspberry, coffee, peanut butter, hazelnut, and cinnamon flavors. The company's first breakout assortment was her Wine Truffle Collection (\$27) with fillings based on Texas Cabernet, Merlot, and Port inspired by a Valentine's Day event at Becker Vinevards several years ago. In a salute to ancient Aztec tradition, Patel does pair chocolate with chili peppers - habanero, cayenne, and jalapeño - although it's doubtful that Montezuma ever consumed anything quite like the Delysia ghost pepper bark. In addition to working with native peppers and the products of area vintners and distillers, Patel is always looking for ways to engage with

other food artisans. For example, she's created a salted caramel truffle with 64% dark chocolate and salt smoked by Franklin Barbecue, and an award-winning Salt Lick BBQ Dry Rub Chocolate Bark.

On Dec. 1, Patel will roll out the official Delysia Chocolatier newsletter with the opportunity for Delysia for Life membership, "sort of our version of a chocolate-of-the-month club," she explains. Folks who join will be the first to learn of new product launches and get advance notice about upcoming events at the chocolate culinary center and community events where Delysia chocolates will be featured. She's counting on the new promotion as a way to build brand loyalty and help take the company to the next anticipated milestone, a retail store in a more central location. "I have a couple ideas about ways I want to go with the storefront. I figure we're about two years out from that, but it's always on my mind," says the busy entrepreneur. After sampling her

excellent products and touring the factory she created doing her own contracting, planning to shop in a Delysia retail store in the future feels like a pretty safe bet.



Writing the Frontier

MICHENER GRAD KIERAN FITZGERALD PENS THE HOMESMAN by Mike Agresta

"Oh, I'm so used to it, I didn't even know she was there until you mentioned it," Kieran Fitzgerald deadpans as we settle into our table at the Driskill, a Chronicle photographer snapping photos above us with her bright flash bulb.

"Actually," he admits, after my laugh, "I haven't ever been interviewed about screenwriting until now."

Life is changing fast for Fitzgerald, who has worked steadily in Hollywood for the past several years but is only now starting to see the fruits of his labor arrive at local multiplexes. His first major feature, The Homesman, directed by Tommy Lee Jones and starring Jones and Hilary Swank, opens Friday in Austin.

Fitzgerald has met me at the Driskill in part because it's Austin's clearest link to the frontier era that The Homesman depicts. We're also here, of course, to throw back a few. I've known Fitzgerald since he arrived in Austin in 2007 to attend UT's Michener Center for Writers. He's had one foot in Austin ever since, keeping a room in town even as his business trips to Hollywood have become more and more frequent.

Fitzgerald describes The Homesman as "a kind of reverse manifest destiny road trip." It follows a frontier woman (Swank) and a "rapscallion" (Jones) who team up to carry a wag-

onload of three women deemed insane from the Nebraska frontier back east to Iowa, where they can receive proper medical care. The screenplay, which Fitzgerald wrote along with Jones and Wesley Oliver, is based on a

novel by Glendon Swarthout. "From the outset, the going mantra in our mini writing room was that we were

essentially unpacking the absurd idea of westward expansion," he says, gazing out over the Driskill's cowhide upholstery and Western-inspired wall hangings. "We inflicted so much suffering, both

upon the people we were slaughtering along the way and upon ourselves. In particular, the trials and tribulations of women go almost completely un-talked about in cinematic language."

Working with Jones, a true method actor, was an adventure – in particular when Jones tried to multitask writing and preparing for his role as U.S. Rep. Thaddeus Stevens in Lincoln. "We'd be trying to work, and Tommy would get teary talking about abolition," Fitzgerald says.

Later, the three writers pounded out the screenplay on the set of Hope Springs, a geezer rom-com that Jones head-

lined along with Meryl Streep. As Fitzgerald tells it, Jones would run back and forth across the street of the small town where they were shooting, first to film a scene with Streep, then to edit a bit of Homesman dialogue that Fitzgerald had just composed.

"I'd never worked under that kind of pressure before, and for me it was really constructive," Fitzgerald says. "You didn't have much time to think about whether it was good or not. You just whipped it off and we'd be immediately talk-

ing about it as part of the movie." The urgency he learned writing The

Homesman has served him well on more recent projects, he admits - including on his latest, an Edward Snowden biopic for Oliver

But that's a tale for another night, after a gag order has been lifted on the top-secret project. Suffice it to say, from the Old West to the new frontier of digital-era outlaws, Fitzgerald is making a home for himself on the bleeding edge of cinematic storytelling. And he's doing it right here in Austin.

:(Help! My sister is in the middle of a GoFundMe campaign for a food truck concept. She has a cute name and a few good designs and menu items picked out. So far, she has been pretty successful raising money, including from some of our relatives.

Here's the problem: I don't believe that she actually intends to use the money for the food truck. In the past, she has borrowed money from me

for educational or entrepreneurial purposes including this same food truck idea - and failed to even direct the money toward her stated goal, let alone pay me back. She's just really untrustworthy with money. Any time she gets her hands on some, she can't resist spending it on dumb shit.

Now she claims that what I gave her was not enough, and if she can raise just a little more, she'll be able to get her small business going and never ask for anything again. I'd love to see her become self-sufficient, but I'm concerned I'm standing by while she bilks more friends and relatives out of cash. Would it be wrong of me to warn them?

It's hard to apply business ethics to the brave new world of crowdfunding, TATTLE. On websites like GoFundMe (or the more famous Kickstarter), people often send money to strangers they'll never meet, no strings attached. Often these strangers are developing products they'll someday profit from, but the funders get no piece of the action. What's a little extra shadiness - say, lying about how you'll use the money - on top of that?

Legally, nothing. Though a consumer-protection lawsuit in Washington state is currently testing the waters for holding crowdfunding con artists accountable, for now these campaigns are more like panhandling than investment-seeking. If you want to believe that the guy on the street you just handed \$5 to is going to spend it on dinner, that's up to you. We advise, however, that readers follow GoFundMe's official dictum: "Only donate to people you personally know and trust."

Which brings us to your sister, TATTLE. Trust is all any potential crowdfunder has to go on. Insofar as many of your sister's funders are friends and family you share, we heartily encourage you to warn them of your sister's sketchy past behavior. Spread the word widely - but discreetly.

Once they know the facts, be careful to let others make up their own minds about how much they want to trust your sister. We all know people with big dreams who just can't seem to get them off the ground, for whatever reason. Success requires at least a few people believing in you. We can see why you no longer trust your sister, but some relatives may choose to continue to take her at her word even after learning that she hasn't come through in the past. Take that for what it is, an expression of love and care for her, and don't get in its way. :) HD

Disquiet on the Western Front

Hilary Swank and Tommy Lee Jones confront the myths of the Old West

Tommy Lee Jones' second movie as a director is no conventional Western. Look no further than the direction traveled by the film's characters - west to east - for confirmation. The Homesman is a story about the human toll of our nation's westward expansion, about the frontier that cruelly consumed the hopes and sanity of some settlers while at

the same time providing freedom and prosperity to others. The American frontier welcomed those looking for opportunities and fresh starts, but not all the pioneers who hitched their wagons to a Western star

prospered, though theirs are not the stories generally celebrated in myth

and movies. The Homesman literally reverses

course to peek at the abandoned ruins of lives lost to the frontier, the human potential plowed over like last year's crop.

> The American frontier could be especially hard on women, and it's this predicament that confronts a loose community of Nebraska settlers as The Homesman opens. Three wives have lost their minds amid the harsh condi-

enough of their plight to grasp their pain. One woman loses three babies in rapid succession to diphtheria, another tosses her newborn Spader, Hailee Steinfeld, Meryl Streep, Jesse Plemons, Jo Harvey Allen, (R. 122 min.) down an outhouse commode, ***1 and the third is tortured by

her husband's insensitivity

(Swank), a hard-working frontierswoman, who lives on her own and farms her own land. In an early scene, she proposes matrimony to an unmarried male neighbor - something she depicts as a practical business arrangement, but she is rebuffed for being "bossy and too plain." Yet when the local church folk charitably decide to send their three crazy women back east to be cared for amid the comparative civilization of Iowa, Mary Bee is the only person who volunteers to take the women on this compassionate but dangerous journey.

With the three madwomen (Gummer, Otto, and Richter) shackled to the walls of a makeshift paddy wagon, Mary Bee seizes on opportunity when she encounters scoundrel George Briggs (Jones) stuck in a life-threatening position, and exacts from him a promise to help escort the women in exchange for saving his life. The two make awkward companions, and for a while their progress is a bit like that of Katharine Hepburn and Humphrey Bogart in The African Queen as the odd-couple pairing of their characters makes for barbed conversation. The focus of the film is on these two, and their human cargo grows less individuated and more of a mad Greek chorus or team of mythological sirens calling their sister Mary Bee to crash on their rocky shores. The journey is long and arduous, and strays off-track a few times (as in the sequence in which the travelers try to stop for the night at an out-of-place frontier hotel).

Still, Briggs and Cuddy are unforgettable characters. Adapted from the novel by Glendon Swarthout, author of The Shootist and Bless the Beasts & Children, the film will burrow into your flesh like frontier frostbite. The cinematography by Rodrigo Prieto (Brokeback Mountain) also underscores the harsh expanse and risks of the wide-open plains. Swank puts her angular toughness to good use, while Jones delivers one of the best crazy-old-coot performances of his career. The Homesman gives us a West devoid of gunslingers and heroes and hearth vs. hunt dynamics, and instead shows us people trying to get through their days alive and sane.

The Spill Diaspora

Where once there was Spill.com, there is now DoubleToasted.com and OneOfUs.net

When talking to Korey Coleman about Spill.com, the now-defunct movie review website he founded in 2006, he's well aware that people are familiar with the roots of the organization. "Everybody's heard these origin stories," he admits. However, it's a story worth revisiting, especially since the heroes are once again returning to positions of influence in the world of online film commentary. It's the tale of five movie lovers – Coleman, Martin Thomas, Chris Cox, Tony Guerrero, and C. Robert Cargill – and how they built something grand, lost everything but their fans, and carried on with their heads held high.

Up until its closure in December 2013, Spill was an Austin-based hub not just for movie fans, but also lovers of comics, TV, podcasts, and video games. With over 48,000 registered members at its peak, Spill was successful enough to launch an annual convention, Spill Dot Con. The site set itself apart from countless other review sites by including animated reviews with rapid-fire humor. Coleman was in charge of animation, a task he refined through his experience at the Heart of Texas Productions studio, as well as Austin cableaccess favorite *The Reel Deal*.

The Reel Deal was where Coleman began to assemble the crew that would eventually become the mainstays of Spill. First was Tony Guerrero, a devoted fan who was fresh out of high school. Then came Martin Thomas, a graphic designer and former comic book colorist. Chris Cox gave up one of his bartending shifts to help out. Cargill joined soon after, and then there were five. For an entire decade, *The Reel Deal* was a laid-back place to joke about movies. "It was 10 years of just goofing around," Coleman recalls. "It was like our poker night on Wednesdays."

Spill was the spiritual successor to The Reel Deal, and it took off like wildfire. People from around the world showed up at Spill Dot Con. Visitors who met on the website's forums started dating and getting married. The five guys who got together to crack jokes about movies ended up making some very real emotional connections with fans. But eventually, things started to change at Spill. The site was bought by Hollywood.com in 2009, and while the initial pay raises that came with the acquisition were warmly welcomed, troubling signs slowly began to pop up. The Hollywood staff would eventually lose interest, and on December 20, 2013, Spill was taken down. "Unless we could make lots of money, there was only so long they were willing to pay us to tell dick jokes on the Internet," Thomas notes in an irreverent eulogy of sorts.

Here's where the old origin stories stop and the new ones begin. If you've come here looking for the tale of five critics, irritated and resentful at the collapse of their beloved site, then you've come to the wrong place. "Everyone thinks I have anger behind this," Coleman says. "It's business, man. I got eight good years out of this company. I have no bitterness toward [Hollywood] at all." That might be the most interesting revelation out of all this: Spill was not the be-all, end-all goal. It was just one step in a larger, more fragmented journey.

In the months following the dissolution of Spill, the critics regrouped and focused on new projects. Well before the shutdown, an amiable parting of the ways seemed imminent. "Even on their best days," explains Coleman, "I could tell people kind of wished they were doing their own thing, and I didn't begrudge them that." So, rather than keeping the whole crew together, the group split up to home in on their individual passions. Downsizing from the larger Spill staff was also a welcome change. "I think what we were doing was too big. I think it's best to concentrate on something smaller when you're starting out," Coleman observes.

One of the new projects falls under the leadership of Chris Cox. He's now one of the minds behind OneOfUs.net, a site whose mission statement proudly declares itself a "one-stop hub for all geek passion." Looking at Cox's house, it's clear he certainly lives up to the statement. He has Muppets Most Wanted playing on a large TV screen, and his cat Monkey is weaving its way through tall stacks of DVDs and memorabilia. A fullsize Yellow Lantern power battery is sitting on his mantle. He says that the network of podcasts he's put together is what sets OneOfUs apart from other similar sites. "We constantly trade back and forth off one another's podcasts, we film short videos, [and] there's a lot of excitement within the community and the staff itself."

Tony Guerrero is the one Spill critic who has chosen not to pursue new endeavors in the world of film, electing instead to focus on his family. Cargill, on the other hand, has started to gain recognition in the world of movies far beyond Austin. He cowrote the 2012 horror hit *Sinister*, published the novel *Dreams and Shadows* last year, and is now hard at work on two more big-screen adaptations – one for the *Deus Ex* video game series, and one for a Harlan Ellison episode of *The Outer Limits*. His colleagues are hardly surprised that he's found such success. "I actu-

ally lived with Cargill for a couple of years," Cox recalls, "so I can tell you how hard that guy worked when he wasn't making any money."

As for Coleman and Thomas, the downtime between Spill's shutdown and their eventual next project was short-lived ... just three days long, to be exact. "I was ready to leave the country," Coleman says. "I was going to move to Turkey, and I was just going to spend some time writing and drawing, because I hardly had any time to do that on my

own." He might have followed through with that plan had Austin magician Brian Brushwood not encouraged him to hang on to the audience he'd worked so hard to build. A Kickstarter campaign was launched with the goal of \$30,000, and within days, Coleman and Thomas collected more than four times that amount. They now had the funds to start DoubleToasted.com, their new site.

Predictably, many former Spill users have now migrated to both DoubleToasted and OneOfUs, but in an age in which new movie review websites pop up weekly, what sets them apart from the rest of the voices in the crowd? The consensus seems to be one word – personality. Thomas points out that actual film criticism is now less of a priority than

building shows around the personalities of the hosts. "We have our movie podcast that we do in the middle of the week, but most of the other shows are more free-form," he says. Coleman reiterates the need to be unique. "There are billions of people on the Internet, millions are doing podcasts and blogs, and I'm sure there's another subdivision of those millions doing movie reviews," he remarks. "If you don't have a personality that connects with people, then they're going to listen to the person that does connect with them. Why do you know some directors by name, and some you don't? Why do you know Quentin Tarantino? You know him because of his movies, but also because you constantly see him out there being a personality himself." It's an apt comparison - Tarantino famously said he didn't go to film school, he went to films. This is the Spill style of movie criticism, alive and well today. Academic background in film study is welcome, but it takes a backseat to relatability, quick banter, and a general understanding of what makes a movie tick.

Armed with a wealth of personality, both DoubleToasted and OneOfUs want to be recognized as a couple of the strongest options in the rapidly flooding market of online film commentary. "It's definitely as crowded as it could possibly get," Cox says. "Everybody wants to do their own thing, and I think a lot of it's just the fascination with the newness of it all." Thomas agrees that the landscape may be getting oversaturated. "It's so prevalent that it almost loses its value, which is why we try to do something

different with it." But the proprietors of the sites are quick to point out that they aren't rivals. Cox is very complimentary of the DoubleToasted crew, and the feeling is mutual. "I think Chris has done a great job of taking whatever he can take from this experience [at Spill] and making something new out of it," says Coleman. "I admire him for that."

Coleman, Thomas, and Cox all have their eyes set on the future, but they don't mind looking back on the past. When asked how they want Spill to be

remembered, they all instantly talk about the fans rather than themselves. "It gave so many people who feel like outcasts one home, where there were other people like them," says Thomas. "They felt like we were friends, they discovered new best friends. And you know, the spirit of it still lives on." Cox is also surprised by how far the site's influence once reached. "I have this enormous array of friends now, across the globe, because of Spill. That'll always be one of the most valuable things to ever happen to me," he states. Looking ahead, though, Coleman frankly acknowledges how quickly this could all disappear. "I'm very realistic about this. If I can't sustain it, there's always Turkey."

No longer burdened by their previous employers, Nick (Bateman), Kurt (Sudeikis), and Dale (Day) strike out on their own with a super-duper shower contraption. After producing enough units to satisfy the lucrative likes of Bert Hanson (Waltz), the trio is soon screwed out of the deal, and retaliate by holding for ransom Bert's son, Rex (Pine), a victim more than willing to help pull one over on his overbearing pops.

Like the first film, *Horrible Bosses 2* revels in crass slapstick and innuendo rather than foisting any measure of moral queasiness upon its audience, but when it comes to base-level laughs, the sequel delivers enough to sustain itself. Bateman remains the resigned straight man, Sudeikis the utter horndog, Day the energetic spaz, and their reliably manic chemistry is well-matched by Pine, a pretty face proving increasingly game for comic silliness between this and the recent *Stretch*.

Jamie Foxx returns as felon-turned-mentor Motherfucker Jones, as do the previously dastardly Jennifer Aniston and Kevin Spacey (whose two-scene cameo practically duplicates Rob Riggle's fleeting appearance in this summer's 22 Jump Street), helping to maintain the illusion of consistency despite the switch in directors from Seth Gordon to Sean Anders (Sex Drive, That's My Boy).

The humor ranges from situational gags to wordplay both clever and juvenile. Despite routine lapses into gay panic and the kind of dick-stroking shadowplay that was exhausted a decade ago by the *Austin Powers* franchise, there are strong laughs sprinkled throughout, culminating in an unexpectedly inspired climactic car chase. *Horrible Bosses 2* works about as well as its predecessor, while similarly welshing on the premise's potential for truly dark comedy. When considered in contrast to the anemic *Dumb and Dumber To*, though, it's a more agreeably inane dose of shortsighted shenanigans.

PENGUINS OF MADAGASCAR

What's black and white and, at first, a bit of a blur? That'd be the penguin leads of this latest feature from DreamWorks Animation. Regular viewers of the Emmy Award-winning Nickelodeon series *The Penguins of Madagascar* – a spin-off of 2005's *Madagascar*, which also spawned two film sequels – should have no problem identifying old friends. But unless you're especially sensitive to height or a signature hair tuft, the newcomer may have some trouble telling Skipper from Rico from Kowalski, all introduced (as their younger selves) amidst a whirr of droll dialogue, acrobatic action, and an inspired cameo from Werner Herzog.

Does it matter? You get the drift. Voiced by Tom McGrath (co-director of the *Madagascar* series), Skipper is the leader of a ragtag group of amateur secret agents. Kowalski (Miller) is the brains, while wild-eyed Rico (Vernon) boasts a special weapon in his propulsive powers of regurgitation. Young Private (Knights) is the foundling they meet at the film's beginning and coddle like a little brother, but Private wants to be taken seriously now.

And these are serious (okay, seriously silly) times, what with a mad octopus named Dave (Malkovich) determined to wipe out the world's penguin population: Their cuteness offends him. Skipper's unit is on the case, but another, more elite organization called the North Wind has dibs; it's led by Cumberbatch's supercilious, espresso-drinking wolf dubbed "Classified" and includes a sexpot owl named Eva – disappointingly, the lone female in the film.

That is perhaps too many words dispatched on a plot that's hardly the point. A merry entertainment that never pretends to greatness, *Penguins of Madagascar* is all about antics, verbal and visual. A common complaint of modern animated films is that the comedy tries too hard to be adult; arguably, the *Penguins* script (by John Aboud, Michael Colton, and Brandon Sawyer) tilts too near "Dad humor" (oy, these puns). But the film moves so fast, failed jokes are forgotten easily, and its commitment to daffiness strikes the right chord. And, oh yes: Even computer-generated penguins really are just the cutest.

Effectively a prequel to James Wan's above-average 2013 freakout *The Conjuring, Annabelle* provides an origin story for the tiny titular terror, set against the backdrop of Charles Manson's summer of blood. After doctor John Gordon (Horton) surprises his doll-collecting spouse Mia (Wallis) with the as-yet-uncursed doll, the believably bland Californian couple endures a home invasion by creepycrawling "cult" members, and Mia urges John to toss the bloodied Annabelle out with the trash, which he does. Predictably, though, she turns up in the bottom of a moving box after the pair relocates to Pasadena, just as ominous – and equally foreseeable – events begin plaguing Mia. Considering the film's formulaic, low-rent proceedings offer genre fans nothing whatsoever that hasn't been done before, and done better, you might find yourself quoting Rosemary's Baby: "This is no dream, this is really happening." BIRDMAN OR (THE UNEXPECTED VIRTUE OF IGNORANCE)

Where Alejandro González Iñárritu's previous films (Babel, Biutiful) were punishing, Birdman is more like a high-spirited pummeling, and the closest thing to a comedy he's made so far. Michael Keaton plays Riggan Thomas, who once ruled Hollywood as the star of a superhero franchise – he was the titular Birdman – but whose career has since crumbled. Birdman opens just days before Riggan debuts his stage adaptation of Raymond Carver's "What We Talk About When We Talk About Love" – and he's cracking from the stress. The play is in shambles, Riggan's Broadway big-shot co-star (Norton) is stealing his limelight, and Riggan may or may not be going nuts. Birdman moves at a relentless tempo, somewhere between nervous-leg agitation and hair-pulling hysteria. While its many lines of inquiry may not resolve neatly, Iñárritu's film is so

In the town of Cheesebridge, a boy named Eggs (Hempstead-Wright) is believed to have been kidnapped and eaten by the trolls beneath town. Lord Portley-Rind (Harris) has hired the Fagin-esque Archibald Snatcher (Kingsley) to exterminate every last one of the boxtrolls, who are revealed to be shy, harmless tinkerers. With characters seemingly created by assembly line, devoid of an essential amount of backstory, it's hard to care whatever transpires. O THE EQUALIZER

D: Antoine Fuqua; with Denzel Washington, Marton Csokas, Chloë Grace Moretz, David Harbour, Haley Bennett. (R, 131 min.) Fuqua directs and Washington stars in this nearly perfect revenge outing. Beautifully shot, if a little overindulgent, The Equalizer offers a tightly built narrative that is faithfully generic, consistently smart, and exciting. Based on the old TV show, this take begins with Robert McCall (Washington) leading a routine life. But when Teri (Moretz), a hooker who eats at the diner where he hangs out nightly, gets in trouble with the Russian mob, McCall makes the moral decision to come to her aid. This soon requires violence, at which he is mysteriously an expert. Then, of course, McCall's action against the local boys results in a master Russian enforcer being sent over to track him down. While it is skillfully structured, undoubtedly some will criticize The Equalizer as being overly violent. At a high-end ski resort in the French Alps, a family of four - Tomas (Kuhnke). Ebba (Kongsli), and their two kids (Clara and Vincent Wettergren) - go about their holiday. During a passing moment of peril (let's keep it vague), a decision is made or, more charitably, a body's automatic response takes over. Nature punches nurture in the face, and for the rest of the film, the family tries to recover from the blow. Writer/director Ruben Östlund is aces with both the human scale and the biblically awesome. For all its cacophonous chaos and half-crazed characters, Fury - about an American Sherman tank crew trundling its way to Berlin during the waning and most deadly days of World War II - never quite reaches the shellshocked heights required to make it a bona fide pillar of cinematic combat. As tank commander Sgt. Don Collier. Pitt is both his crew's literal and figurative "Wardaddy" and the moral compass of the film. "This is war, there is no right or wrong," he hollers at milquetoast replacement gunner Norman (Lerman), an army typist suddenly thrust into the maw of hell. The film's unfailingly realistic set-pieces, while often pulse-poundingly well-shot, too often fail to connect emotionally. Fury's worth seeing on a big screen - if only to wallow in the sprawling sound design and muddy, bloody, tank-on-tank melees - but it's too strangely hidebound by overused dramatic tropes to inflict serious damage. It's also, by turns, hilarious, harrowing, hopeful, and sad. No kidding: Bring your handkerchiefs, because this is some seriously emo documentary filmmaking. As a loving portrait of an artist fading away before his very eyes, I'll Be Me is nevertheless a joy to watch. Indeed, it's a record of Campbell's massive, 150-date, cross-country farewell tour, but the film is just as much about Alzheimer's, with director Keach tracking the effects of the degenerative disease on Campbell's life, onstage and off. Ultimately, I'll Be Me is both an unconventional tribute to an American icon and a deep-down cri de coeur for more research on viable ways to retard the progression of Alzheimer's. Then Nick returns home on their fifth anniversary to find Amy missing. Enter detective Boney (Dickens) and her sidekick cop Jim Gilpin (Fugit), who quickly establish that there's been a whole lot of crimson spilled in the kitchen, and suddenly Nick is Suspect No. 1. THE HUNGER GAMES: **MOCKINGJAY - PART 1**

This first go at the final book in Suzanne Collins' bestselling young-adult trilogy uncaps a fat, neon highlighter to underscore a defining idea of the series: that Katniss Everdeen (Lawrence) - an often galvanizing force for rebellion in the brutalized 12 districts that make up the nation of Panem - is a mere shuttlecock batted between sides in a war for hearts and minds. Taking place largely in a subterranean barricade below the supposedly bombed-out District 13 - where the citizenry have been covertly hatching revolutionary plans for 75 years - Mockingiay turns at once wandering and tunnel-visioned. The filmmakers were wise to hang Part I's climax on a tense military mission unseen in the book, but the film unwisely lumbers on afterward and the action deflates. INTERSTELLAR

Interstellar is riddled with ridiculisms. And yet: Nolan, a notoriously chilly filmmaker who's never shown much faculty with matters of the heart, is pinning that heart squarely on his sleeve. Boldly swinging for the rafters, he's uncharacteristically willing to embarrass himself here. There's a lot to admire in that. Interstellar is about humanity's last-ditch effort to find a habitable planet in another galaxy after it becomes clear that Earth is death-rattling. McConaughey plays single dad Cooper, who agrees to pilot the expedition, even though it means missing out on raising his children. So much of Interstellar, baggy and beautiful in ragged measures, comes qualified: Its science-y info-dumps sound so serious one suspects they're actually very silly; even the most predictable plot turn zings with Nolan's master hand at tension-building: and if the script is overly enamored with front-porch poeticisms and turgid monologues about love - oh, how the heart aches when a child cries for her father. Luckily for us, what losef doesn't realize is that Wick was a former employee of his father. NYC kingnin Viggo (Nyqvist), and remains a hitman of remarkable prowess: An entire reel is devoted to establishing Wick's legendary reputation before the film sets about fulfilling it in grand displays of violence. A fight coordinator on the Matrix trilogy, first-time director Chad Stahelski surely respects the choreography of his profession, but the film ultimately belongs to Reeves, who convincingly embodies both the calm before the storm and its subsequent capacity for ruin. Tempers roil on a steady, low heat, before predictably boiling over, as Duvall's small-town Indiana judge gets into a legal scrap of his own and middle son Hank (Downey Jr.) dutifully steps into the breach. Dramatically, this is not scintillating stuff: your average Lifetime Movie Network production boasts a far better grasp on what makes a story compelling, structurally and emotionally. Prioritizing wholesome values over production values, Left Behind is a thoroughly laughable attempt to marry bombast with sermonizing. ROSEWATER

With this auspicious debut as a film director, Daily Show host Jon Stewart proves his dramatic chops. Adapted from Newsweek journalist Maziar Bahari's book Then They Came for Me, Rosewater is a well-crafted account of Bahari's detention in an Iranian prison - a film which emphasizes humanity over headlines and wholeheartedly celebrates freedom of speech. After he heads to Tehran to cover the 2009 national elections, Iranian authorities suspect Bahari (García Bernal) of being an American spy and, soon, conduct a raid. So begins Bahari's prison captivity, which is remarkable more for its tedium than its ferocity. As Bahari's journey becomes more internal. Stewart keeps the drama at an unfailingly even keel - which may actually be the film's biggest problem. Nevertheless, Rosewater successfully translates its sobering concerns into engaging dramatic fodder and, ultimately, verifies the fact that freedom of the press has no greater champion than Jon Stewart. In fact, all the actors in writer/ director Theodore Melfi's feature debut are at their best, and manage to keep this crowd-pleasing comedy buoyant, even as it sails through sappy waters. The story kicks into gear when new neighbors, Maggie (McCarthy) and her son Oliver (Lieberher), move into the house next door to Vincent in Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn. A newly single mom, Maggie works late hours, and the grouch next door quickly becomes Oliver's after-school babysitter. If you scratch the surface too deeply, a few things might not ring true, but there's no greater pleasure to be had than *St. Vincent*'s opening and closing sequences during which Murray dances and sings along to the music coming through his headphones. Inspired by Jane Wilde Hawking's memoir about life with her former husband, theoretical physicist Stephen Hawking, The Theory of Everything is a delicate observation of the boundless universe of love's possibilities - what we're willing to give, what we're willing to take, what we're willing to endure. The couple's courtship begins at Cambridge in 1962: Stephen (Redmayne) is a shy young man with a wide, toothy grin; Jane (Jones) is a selfpossessed young woman who finds herself drawn to this unlikeliest of suitors. Soon, omens of Stephen's degenerative illness begin to manifest, and he withdraws from the world - but Jane refuses to allow him to go gently. It's a remarkable love story, but as lovely as the film is, it's strangely inert. What takes The Theory of Everything into the cosmos is Redmayne's extraordinary performance. D: Damien Chazelle; with Miles Teller, J.K. Simmons, Melissa Benoist, Paul Reiser, Austin Stowell, Nate Lang. (R, 107 min.)

This film, about a young jazz drummer at a cutthroatcompetitive conservatory, doesn't just borrow a cup of energy from its percussive score - it steals a whole quart. Socially maladroit and painfully single-minded, freshman Andrew (Teller) lives only to drum. Early on, he's tapped by a brutal instructor named Fletcher (Simmons) to join his elite competition band. Fletcher, a legendary monster, knows how to motivate this dewyeyed hopeful, and Andrew does get better - he gets great, actually - even as he shudders when his alpha barks. Ultimately, writer/director Damien Chazelle isn't interested in the long lens. He's tightly fixated on master and supplicant, each with his own agenda, and the film is essentially one long cockfight. But, does Chazelle really have anything unique to say about Teller's youngling or Simmons' raging megalomaniac? The leads' prolonged, puffed-feathers sparring is entertaining while it lasts, but the sensation is only fleeting. (10/31/2014)

MUSIC Chilling With ScoreMore

Upon entering **ScoreMore**'s South Austin office space, a half-dozen carefree college girls hang out on couches, doing homework and giggling. Down the corridor, in separate corner offices, two baby-faced 25-year-olds with laidback demeanors attend to constantly ringing cell phones. More interns? No. That's **Sascha Guttfreund** and **Claire Bogle**, owners of the thriving concert promotion business.

ScoreMore isn't the future of hip-hop and dance music booking in Texas. It's the present. With a new foothold in the untapped San Antonio market, and diversification into artist management, their profile's expanding.

"We think of ourselves as Switzerland," Guttfreund alludes to ScoreMore's easygoing role in Austin's competitive live music industry. He compares his company to Jet Blue while other bookers, like **C3** and **Transmission**, are evidently Delta and American Airlines. "We're not trying to be the biggest, but we're good at what we do."

And that's working the college demographic. Bogle, a New Mexico native with a background in marketing, and Guttfreund, an Angeleno who paid for UT by simultaneously waiting tables at **Texas Land & Cattle**, selling print advertising, and hawking cable and Internet door-to-door, founded ScoreMore five years ago with students in mind. They saw businesses forcing themselves on students, and instead asked students what they wanted.

"I surrounded myself with other 18- and 22-year-old music fans, and we all voted on what acts to book," explains Guttfreund.

Just weeks after ScoreMore's establishment in January 2010, they booked rapper **J. Cole**'s first tour. His album soon debuted at No. 1. In 2011, they brought **Kendrick Lamar** to **Red 7** where he played to 90 people – one of several hip-hop superstars ScoreMore booked pre-boom, including **Macklemore** and **Wiz Khalifa**.

Identifying student interests was easy because Guttfreund was still in college. In fact, he only graduated in May, with a degree in cor-

porate communications. ScoreMore now books about 150 shows a year, many in Austin, plus runs hitting Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, El Paso, San Marcos, and Baton Rouge. They produce the **JMBLYA** festival, are a partner and producer at El Paso's **Neon Desert** fest, and Guttfreund is a talent buyer for

the big-time Pemberton Festival in Vancouver.

Both Bogle and Guttfreund have also babystepped into artist management. Bogle represents 21-year-old rapper/singer **Kali Uchis**, who recently logged a collaboration with **Snoop Dogg**, and Guttfreund manages burgeoning Canadian hip-hop act **Tory Lanez**, accruing seven-digit view counts on **YouTube**.

This week, ScoreMore planted a flag outside Austin city limits in announcing they'll assume significant booking responsibilities at San Antonio's **Backstage Live** and will be key in its rebranding as **Alamo City Music Hall**. The connection between Backstage owner **Sylvia Fernandez** and ScoreMore was **Jason Sabala**, former **Emo's** manager who now owns **Midway Field House** and **Buzz Mill**. Other bookers will contribute to ACMH, but ScoreMore's signature hip-hop and dance programming will act as the backbone. And what ScoreMore hopes to build has value beyond two rooms that make up the Backstage compound, because the building at 1305 E.

PLAYBACK KEVIN CURTIN

Houston St. has long been expected to be renovated into apartments. "As far as I know, there

are no immediate plans for changes," offers Guttfreund. "They've been working on developing condos there for a very long time, and there hasn't been any traction. Should our brand – Alamo City Music Hall – have to relocate, if we've done our job right, people will have no problem moving with us to our new home."

It's a significant play for an Austin promoter to look south. While Transmission recently opened offices in Dallas and C3 continues **Lollapalooza**-ing all over South America, the nation's seventh largest city is just down the road.

"Austin, Houston, and Dallas are all oversaturated, and San Antonio's such an underserved market," says Bogle. "I love the culture there. In Houston, the crowd is tweeting about how much fun they're having, but they're worried about their shoes getting fucked up. San Antonio has these kids who love music and they're hungry for music other than rock. You can sense that at shows, and it gives me chills."

SAXON PUB LOOKS DOWN THE ROAD

"It's inevitable – this city's turning over. All the old things are turning into new things," mused **Saxon Pub** owner **Joe Ables** on Monday when asked if his beloved club would relocate to an incoming development at St. Elmo and South Congress. City Council approved rezoning of that area for a mixed-use development on nine and a half acres, called **St. Elmo's Market and Lofts**, last Thursday.

"This is three or four years down the road," explained Ables. "There's a lot of work to be done, discussions to be had, and I need to put a package together. It could be a really good opportunity for the Saxon Pub to move into a larger venue. We're looking at somewhere along the lines of 4,000 to 5,000 square feet and 200 to 300 seats."

The Saxon's longstanding location at 1320 S. Lamar is about 3,000 square feet. He says the prospective location would have ample parking. Currently, his customers are using a valet service. Ables would be involved in laying out the new property, planned to be a free-standing building set amongst condos.

"If I don't have anything to do with the construction, design, and production, then I won't do it," he says.

One prospect regarding a new venue that excites Ables is using it as an exhibit area for the **Texas Heritage Songwriters' Hall of Fame**, for whose association he serves on the board. As for the current space, which he opened in 1990 and named after another local singer-songwriter haven that existed here in the late Sixties/early Seventies, he's considering repurposing it as a new small venue that would be a joint partnership with his landlord.

"We still need small venues for bands to get started, so it might be a better opportunity for young bands to get in a place with less overhead."

For the time being, it's business as usual at the Saxon Pub, which celebrates its 25th anniversary in the spring.

HALF NOTES

OXFORD AMERICAN LASSOS TEXAS for its annual Southern Music Issue, hitting newsstands Monday. The literary quarterly's latest glorification of regional culture, featuring an arresting vintage cover portrait of Guy and Susanna Clark, includes profiles ranging from DJ Screw to Willie Nelson's ruffian drummer/bodyguard Paul English. The Chronicle's well-represented through Editor Louis Black's essay on Daniel Johnston, esteemed contributor Bill Bentley charting the growth of Charlie Sexton, and Margaret Moser's life story told through musical mile-markers. Per tradition, the magazine befriends an epic companion CD touting Texas rock (Spoon), jazz (Ornette Coleman), outlaw country (Waylon Jennings), Tex-Mex (Freddy Fender), and Western swing (Bob Wills). Waterloo Records helps launch the issue with a reading, Q&A, and autograph session featuring Moser, Black, and Joe Nick Patoski on Dec. 9, 6pm.

ISAIAH "IKEY" OWENS, the Grammy-winning keyboardist for Mars Volta and Jack White, whose heart stopped beating unexpectedly in October, laid roots in Austin music. He'd recently cut the bulk of his upcoming solo album here, contributed to the latest Midnight Masses LP, and produced releases by **Boyfrndz** and the **Harms**. On Monday, friends and family celebrate his life through music at Cheer Up Charlie's. "It going to be like a live mixtape of Ikey's favorite songs and originals," said longtime friend and event organizer Chase Frank. Songs in the Key of Ikey will feature performances by Frank's psychedelic girl-group the Harms with poet Derrick Brown, Owens collaborators 2Mex (Look Daggers), Mendee Ichikawa (Free Moral Agents), and DJ Dennis Owens. The main event is a tribute act including local affiliates Joseph Woullard, Bill Stevenson, Aaron Perez. his studio-mate Alec Esh. and brother Aaron Owens.

BLOODSHOT RECORDS, the Chicago label





The Big Picture

Are sisters in Austin still doing it for themselves?

When Marcia Ball moved to Austin in the early Seventies there were only a handful of female musicians performing regularly: Mary Hattersley of Greezy Wheels, Janet Lynn, Chris O'Connell with Asleep at the Wheel, Jerry Jo Jones of Plum Nelly, and Ernie Mae Miller and Margaret Wright, who performed at the Driskill Hotel. Forty years on, that list grows longer by the day. The women of today's scene not only support one another, they still encounter male chauvinist pushback.

Legendary local venues close regularly, but Hot Club of Cowtown fiddler Elana James and former Timbuk 3 breakout Barbara K gather a backyard full of people

at the former's Central Austin home to perform original and traditional folk tunes without amplification. Take in an Erin Ivey gig and there's Elizabeth McQueen adding harmonies. Suzanna Choffel in the audience when Charlie Faye tries out new tunes at Strange Brew – commonplace.

"It's always been a hand up kind of a town," nods Ball. "I hope that continues. The other day someone mentioned to me another piano player in town and said, 'You better watch out. She's comin' up right behind you.' I said, 'She could stand on my shoulder and I would push her over.'

"I've got nothing to lose by someone else's success and everything to gain."

BANDLEADERS

Lauren Larson, fireball guitarist of Ume, breathes a small chuckle when asked if she's ever run into problems being a female bandleader. The world of shredders she inhabits possesses a deep male bias and she's experienced it firsthand. There was the British Summer Time Festival in London's Hyde Park this past July, for instance, where she shared a bill with Black Sabbath, Motörhead, and Soundgarden.

"I was the only woman onstage that day," she recalls. "When I first picked up my guitar I thought, 'I want to be seen as a guitar player, not an anomaly because I'm a woman.' But even on the last tour I wasn't allowed backstage at one venue because they didn't believe I was in the band. I've had people ask me if I was the dancer in the band."

In a much less power-packed situation, Selena Rosenbaum of traditional country

outfit Rosie & the Ramblers faces similar problems here in Texas.

"I do all the booking," she says, "but when we get to clubs sometimes they only want to deal with the male members of the band. I go, 'Hold on. You've been talking to me the whole time.' It's obnoxious, but it's pretty widespread. I'm just trying to remind people that a woman can front a country band."

A three-time 2014 Austin Music Awardwinner in the categories of Best Female Vocalist, Best Latin Traditional, and Best Latin Rock, Gina Chavez says women aren't necessarily a minority in numbers, but in music, men rule.

"It's like Latino musicians," she winces. "Why do you have to point out that we're Latino? As a woman and as a bandleader, the obstacles are sometimes subtle. It's a vibe. I walk into a room and the atmosphere changes. I usually walk into the place with a guitar and introduce myself, so as not to give people a lot of room to assume."

BLUES

For most, the blues feels stuck in the past, a creative dead end performed by guitar hero wannabes with a lack of self awareness wherein they can't recognize their own cliches. Not in Austin, however. Even with its Home of the Blues missing in action (Antone's), blues musicians thrive.

Carolyn Wonderland, Ruthie Foster, and Shelley King are no Janis Joplin wannabes even if they follow the path blazed by the Port Arthur belter more than 50 years ago. Wonderland's exceptional guitar style,

Foster's immense vocal talent, and King's songwriting have garnered all three locals a large enough national audience that they perform here infrequently. They're successful, yet the journey's frequently been inward.

"The main thing for me is my own feeling of accomplishment," explains King, named Texas State Musician in 2008. "Like how I feel when I write a good song. When someone tells me one of my songs helped them through something, that's the ultimate success. It's not about how many albums I sell. Connecting with people is more important than dollar signs."

"I hope that people get where I'm at, depending on where I am at a particular time," offers Foster. "It means a lot to me that I have a varied audience, people from different backgrounds, folks who love all genres of music. I get people who don't know blues or gospel, but they love my stuff."

Foster's achieved that, judging by the demograph-

ics at a recent album release show at the Paramount Theatre for fifth album *Promise* of a Brand New Day. There, members of Mingo Fishtrap and Luther Dickinson of the North Mississippi All Stars brought her blues/soul hybrid to new heights.

Preparing a live set recorded at Antone's before it closed, Wonderland remains as straightforward as her music.

"What's success?" she repeats. "If I go out and don't suck. Every night's a new night to succeed or fail. I feel like I do both regularly. I feel like my playing's gotten better, but I don't really understand the business of it, and I've tried for 20 years.

"I just hope they like the records."

THE BIG PICTURE

Originally from Houston, Kat Edmonson began her music career in Austin. Nevertheless, it took moving to New York to catapult her to a national audience. September's *The Big Picture* generated acclaim for a genre-bending mix of mid-20th century jazz and pop.

"This was the best place to get my start," affirmed the petite singer in Austin last month. "What I was doing was a niche in the landscape of Americana music. I was offering a jazz flair with the old American songbook. There weren't many venues here for the type of music I was doing."

Austin's an acknowledged music mecca, but its industry infrastructure remains painfully lacking. In 2010, Edmonson hoped to split her time between Texas and New

York, but found a booking agent, management team, and a major label there in Sony Masterworks. Not that those seeds hadn't been planted here.

"I was trying to attract booking agents all the time, inviting them to my shows," she recounts, "but apparently I didn't have enough of a package for them. The fact that I brought 1,000 people to the Paramount Theatre for my record release show was monumental. I signed with them that day during South by Southwest.

"Austin was the perfect place for that. It's an incubator."

On the second track from *The Big Picture*, "Avion," the 31-year-old singer wonders, "What is all this for if I don't feel free?" While not explicitly about leaving Texas, it's a sentiment that trails her career.

"The song expresses that I never want to feel limited by anything. By genre, by my potential reach for fans, where I fit in with the music industry, what I do as an artist," she explains. "With each

record I make, I'm trying to share who I am more and more. I'm developing and learning about myself as I'm creating, and my fans are learning more about me.

"If you listen to my first record, I'm just a jazz chanteuse singing jazz covers and that's what I do best. Meanwhile, I've been writing since I was at least 9. I listen and identify with so many types of music that I never want to be limited to one thing. I want to be able to show all my interests and my passions."

On a Saturday afternoon in October, Suzanna Choffel, Elizabeth McQueen, BettySoo, Charlie Faye, and Erin Ivey gather in a deep South Austin living room to share some wine and talk about what it means to be an Austin musician. Individually, they represent some of the capital's best singer-songwriters, but they don't exist in a vacuum, so they entwine in a variety of ways. From CONTINUED ON **P.70**

recording to recommending backing musicians, they're lenders of shoulders to lean on. "Why wouldn't we?" asks Soo. "We all

like each other's music."

"Plus, we like each other as people," chimes in Choffel.

"It's one of the best things about living in Austin," states McQueen. "You're surrounded by wonderful and talented people who you can collaborate with in so many ways. That's not the case everywhere."

Choffel possesses a unique vantage point among the group as she currently splits time between Austin and New York. She claims to be an introvert when it comes to collaboration, but a bigger obstacle is the sheer size of the city.

"It's harder to support each other at shows in New York, because there's so much going

on and just getting to a show is a pain in the ass," she reports. "In Austin, I'm much more likely to get in my car to see whoever is playing. Even friendships are harder there, but I wouldn't say it's less warm."

Originally from New York, Charlie Faye's lived all over the country, and while she's here for the long haul, there's one aspect of collaboration - cowriting songs - that just doesn't happen in this music-crazed town.

"Nashville is like the cowrit- z ing capital of the world and I have a couple of people there that I love to work with when a I'm there," she says. "L.A. is the same way. In Austin, it would be

easy for us to get together and write, but it's not really part of our culture."

"In Nashville, performers aren't always writers," points out Choffel. "There's a subculture there of writers."

"Other places are more work-oriented," agrees Faye. "In Austin, we're more socially oriented. We're all doing our work, but we have genuine social relationships with each other."

Like Edmonson, they all agree there's a need for more infrastructure here. Between that, the city's incredible growth, and the rising cost of living, making a living here as a full-time musician is harder than ever.

"I feel like every time I go to L.A. or Nashville, I can make more happen there with a few chance meetings than I can make happen here in years," admits Faye. "We don't have the kind of people here that can push a button and say, 'I'm going to get you on this show or on this tour."

"Ultimately, Austin is a really great place to make a life," says Ivey. "It can always be better. Organizations like SIMS and HAAM make a difference. I think the more healthy you make the community for middle-class musicians, the more the entire city will thrive."

here. The escalating cost of living is new.

"But it doesn't seem to hurt the influx of musicians and young people who keep a town vibrant and alive," she acknowledges. "What's changed isn't so much about Austin and its growth. It's the difference between my generation and the younger generations in the way they hear music. They don't necessarily hear music the same way we do.

"We went out to dance and to hear music every night. I think this generation goes out to a festival or a big show, but not as much to a honky-tonk or to hear a band. We went to see our friends all the time."

Ginger Leigh hasn't been in town quite that long. Twenty-two years, she says proudly. The San Antonio native currently works on her 10th album of originals, a couple of which were performed by her first act, a still-popular duo with Sarah Dashew. Leigh focuses on the economy of local music from a different angle.

"We've been charging \$10 at the door for two decades," she laments. "The economy changes, but we don't get to change with it. We charge \$12 or \$15 and people balk at it. We need a raise. Everything moves forward, but if you're going to call it the live music capital of the

world, make sure you keep things alive.

"The city needs to step in and save some of the venues. The city should declare some of those places landmarks. Look at what's happened to the Broken Spoke. The same thing is about to happen with the Saxon Pub."

"There's destruction going on of all the amazing parts of what makes Austin, Austin," agrees Sara Hickman. "I'm really sad about all the mom-and-pop stores, the places that made Austin weird that are becoming Austin wired. Austin feels like a soundtracks, commercials, and jingles, but also teaches. Her local appearances are few for the reasons outlined by Leigh.

"I don't play much here because there's no money in it - except when I play parties or private events," she says. "I live in Austin because it's a great city, because it's a good family environment."

She laughs, then adds, "Although it's starting to look a lot like Miami."

NEWBIES

Grace London, who will soon turn 15, won the Old Settler's Music Festival's Youth Talent competition in 2011. She seems grounded and much more reflective than a high school sophomore has any reason to be.

"I do think about the different paths I can take," she admits. "I've thought about the future maybe too much."

Chronicle writer, bandleader, and local music scion William Harries Graham hosted under-18 nights at Maria's Taco Xpress,

which London took part in, but that's gone away and nothing has taken its place. She did a stint in recently signed rockers Residual Kid, but she bemoans the lack of venues - or just one venue that caters to the U18 set.

"At 15 you can't get a gig, because your friends can't

drink at the bar," she says. Lili Hickman Waldon and Io Hickman also

performed at Maria's, which gained them a great deal of exposure. They appear occasionally now with their mom Sara and her husband Lance Shriner. That helps with gigs.

"It's hard being a teenager and getting trust from places to play," says Io.

Lili is considering a move to Portland, Ore. "I have a great support system," she says, "but I have to get out of Austin for a while just to grow as a person."

"I see the growth as more in the size of the audience and not necessarily the number of musicians. That's a big benefit. Sure it's changing from what it was, but we're still a lot better off than most places we've been to."

STAND UP AND BE COUNTED!



KGSR BROADCASTS VOL. 22 (KGSR Radio Austin)

Signaling Austin's holiday season as much as pecan pie, KGSR's annual 2-CD compilation of broadcast recordings arrives with an additional charity in the mix, a portion of the proceeds benefiting construction of the new Seton Medical Center alongside the station's unsparing support of the SIMS Foundation. Introductory honors go to Australian quintet Boy & Bear, starting the first disc dreamily on "Southern Sun," followed with a stellar acoustic roll of "Riptide" by fellow countryman Vance Joy. Lucius returns us stateside boasting the yelping quirk of "Turn It Around," and Brett Dennen tweaks a Tom Petty vibe across new cut "Wild Child" to Charlie Mars' crowd singalong "The Money." Broadcasts dips locally eight tracks in with the Outkast "Hey Ya" strum of Max Frost breakout "White Lies." Jake Bugg loosens "Lightning Bolt" and Frank Turner's gritty "Recovery" bristles following the emotional pull of Noah Gundersen and Robert Ellis, but Elle King trumps on a stripped-down and breathy "Ex's and Oh's." Back-end tracks lag until Lissie unloads a Stevie Nicks growl on "Further Away (Romance Police)" and Aaron Behrens howls to a close with "Keep On Rising." Shakey Graves carries the local flag in commencing disc two with a raw "Dearly Departed." Tori Amos' stunning "Oysters" slides awkwardly into G. Love's "Nothing Quite Like Home" and Bob Schneider's acoustic "Dirty Feeling." The center mellows behind Jeremy Messersmith, Birds of Tokyo, Jamestown Revival, and the Mowgli's, but ZZ Ward kicks funk into the closing run of Spanish Gold's "Out on the Street," locals Saints of Valory on "Long Time Coming," and St. Paul & the Broken Bones grooving "Call Me." With unique performances more readily accessible throughout online media -2014 marks the first year Broadcasts is available digitally - KGSR's yearly offering loses some traditional relevance, but remains a sound of our town. – Doug Freeman ***

LACE **CURTAINS** A Signed Piece of Paper (Female Fantasy Records) Garage rock hippies Harlem are dead, but if you sync up the ensu-

ing work of Curtis O'Mara's Grape St. and Michael Coomers' Lace Curtains, the results equal the charmingly immature late trio's drunken juvenile pop. Besides "Pink and Gold" and "Saint Vitus" - a level of energy unto itself in this circle - the latter's second platter offers cheeky love songs in contrast to Grape St.'s late-night retro sockhop. "Be Good" and "Crocodile Tears" play as lullabies; "Boardwalk to the Alps" and "Wilshire and Fairfax" the dejected heartbreakers. There's real soul with a modern shoegaze swing to it ("The Fly"), and a sand-swept jaunt through psychedelia ("Kali"). Coomers feigns charming apathy throughout the halfhour. He'll never sound like he's working for a minute, and that's the secret to A Signed Piece of Paper.

MOONLIGHT TOWERS Heartbeat Overdrive (Chicken Ranch)

Power pop might be one of the few subgenres of rock with a

pulse. Moonlight Towers exists on the edges of that brand, taking its cues from American heartland acts like Cheap Trick and Tom Petty. Heartbeat Overdrive, the locals' fourth disc and first since 2011's widely praised Day Is the New Night, finds singer, songwriter, and guitarist James Stevens tackling heavier subject matter than he's approached in the past. Heartbeat races when he's inspired by relationships fracturing, his dad passing away, and the monotony of everyday life. Yet the veteran Austin guartet puts on a brave face with more than enough jangle and bright atmospherics to keep the darkness at bay. Opener "Out of the Grey" and the title track are among Stevens' most

melodic and affecting. He teeters on the brink throughout, but in the end there's survival and, better still, thriving. ***

UNTO ASHES **Ghosts Captured** (Projekt) Gothic, electronic,


madrigal: The distinctive vision of Lockhart's Michael Laird swirls through a catalog of

seven beguiling LPs bewitched by centuriesold traditions. His band's first compilation, Ghosts Captured turns on an axis of pop/rock covers found on prior platters. A few pieces of low-hanging fruit aside (the Cure; fellow travelers Current 93 and Qntal; Projekt labelmates Lycia), the set list takes stylistically incompatible standards and gives them radical but reverent reinterpretations. Filtered through Laird's pagan prism, New Order's "The Him" transforms into a haunted hymn, while Neil Young's "The Needle and the Damage Done" becomes a droning communion with a melancholy spirit. Unto Ashes lifts the melody from Norwegian synth-pop troop Apoptygma Berzerk's "Kathy's Song" and turns it into gorgeous folk, and filters the Butthole Surfers' "The Birds Are Dying" through a choralenhanced string section. Ethereal acoustic versions of Blue Öyster Cult's "Don't Fear the Reaper" and Van Halen's "Runnin' With the Devil" nets two more Ghosts Captured. *** Michael Toland

ROGER **SELLERS** Primitives (Punctum Records)

Primitives commences with droning organ tones soaring over splashes, chirps,

and warped vocals before hitting on a pulse of guitar scrapes that unfold into an angel harmony of triple-tracked cooing. It's an art composition revealing itself as a pop song, and thus a mission statement for Roger Sellers, who scuffs the lines between indie



Versus Since compact discs have become expendable vessels of digital information, destined for upload then discarded, CDs worth cherishing are now increasingly rare. You won't throw away Versus, a collaborative project of give-and-take covers by Borrisokane and like-minded locals, lovingly

housed in a die-cut wooden box containing six EPs that can be puzzled into a visual collage. Each extended play features art-pop specialists Borrisokane covering a contributing band that returns the favor. Darkwave ensemble Knifight's powerhouse cover of its sponsors' "Victoria, Please" stands single-worthy, while Home by Hovercraft



follows by appropriating a mutated ringtone to underscore the Texas State grad's agile verse: "I couldn't imagine how it made you feel/ Nothing is real if nothing appeals/ And I couldn't stop with that look in your eyes." That becomes a loop amongst cycloning keyboard and drumline snare, evidencing the composer's methods: Everything's a sample. The eight-song effort peaks on echo-pop triumph "Waves," a tranquil piano throb met with a singular melody making space for the Austinite's vox, recalling Band of Horses' Ben Bridwell. Toward the back end, the epic "Lates" germinates from spacey to sublime over six minutes with an advancing tattoo of syncopated toms. Primitive's a portable version of Sellers' popular one-man show. You wouldn't mistake it for a band, but you might confuse it with a flying dream. – Kevin Curtin ****



"I Like Lies" and "Have a Nice Day," sung by Valentine and Monsees, respectively, further embody the band's endearing mix of cockiness and craft, as does an authoritative reading of Roy Head's 1965 smash "Treat Her Right." - Scott Schinder ****

Ben Watt CACTUS CAFE. THURSDAY 4

"The part of me that made North Marine Drive in 1983 has never really gone away," says Ben Watt, referring to his first solo album, which he made as a 19-year-old altfolkie, and which the 51-year-old Brit has belatedly followed up with the guietly stunning Hendra.

Watt wasn't exactly idle during the threedecade gap between said releases. In the interim, he gained international stardom as half of Everything but the Girl, in which Watt's compositions were usually sung by his wife Tracey Thorn. He also authored a pair of acclaimed books, and spun off into clubland as a DJ and producer, half of Lazy Dog, founder of the Buzzin' Fly label, and host of a popular electronica show on BBC Radio 6.

He was working on his recently published family memoir Romany and Tom when the sudden death of his half sister plunged him into the emotion-charged songwriting binge that spawned Hendra.

"The songs came out in a rush of compulsion, and I realized I was finally reconnecting with that 19-year-old version of myself," explains Watt, adding, "I spent much of early 2013 locked in my basement writing and literally finding my voice again. I hadn't sung in seriousness for a long time. It was an intense experience."

Comparing his new album to its predecessor, Watt gets contemplative,

"Hendra contains songs of experience, a life lived, while North Marine Drive contained songs of adolescent innocence. Binding

them both is a kind of raw earnestness, I think - a desire to find a common language with the audience, a truthfulness about life.

"Life can become a series of blows," he continues. "I wanted to write about that: about how those blows land, and what defenses we have to survive them. In that sense, the album starts in a dark

place, but is very much about resilience, survival, and, in the end, hope." - Scott Schinder

In a town overflowing with sensational sounds, it's easy to forget we have a band as supersonic as Tia Carrera. Playing improvisational psychedelia with the intensity of heavy metal. Erik Conn.
