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


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
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

Dear Editor,

Regarding the article "Exclusively for Boneheads," [News, March 18]: Apparently Austin was recently named as the most segregated city in the U.S. in some poll, and I personally applaud the "vandal" for bringing this issue into the limelight.

As a fairly long-term resident of the neighborhood where this heinous act occurred, I have witnessed the steady yuppie-fication of the Eastside and gradual disappearance of my black neighbors who often used to acknowledge me as I passed by. This has not been my general experience with the younger, whiter population that has replaced them. I no longer bother to even say hello to unknown passersby, for fear of uncomfortable stares. I do admit that I work outside all day and my more rugged appearance is not what people are used to nowadays in Austin, and I feel increasingly out of place here. However, I love the music, food, and all that brings people here, including myself years ago. I just wish all Texans could afford to enjoy it as they used to, because it is money that segregates us today, not whites-only signs, but the result is the same, and it is this fact that I think this bonehead was trying to point out. Those that are most disgusted by this act are more than likely those who would cross to the other side of the street when a black person is walking toward them.

One particular street performer I watched angrily referenced police brutality and the incarceration system. "I don't know, it just comes to me," he said to me.

I also had the occasion to experience a Middle Eastern group commenting on the two-state policy, and just missed a hip-hop group from Caracas owing to a booking at a different showcase featuring the music of the American heartland. When Katie Toupin of Houndmouth sang, "You know I am nobody's girl/ I just wasn't made for no diamonds or pearls," it felt as if she was speaking for those of us who want this country to speak for the 100%, or at the very least pay women that much.

On a coffee break, I picked up a New York Times to catch up on the Israeli elections, and, coincidentally, on my way to Russian House, I spoke to a kind Ukrainian hostess about diaspora. She opened up about friends she knew at Maidan, then outlined the night's itinerary, featuring Pakistani music and a set of music from Ghana.

HEADLINES

CITY COUNCIL MEETS today (March 26) with a relatively light agenda but a few items that figure to raise some dust: the return of **Downtown overnight concrete pours**, the manager-at-risk contract for the **ABIA parking garage**, the **"busking"** ordinance, and lease renewal for **Recycled Reads**. See "Council: Recycled Reconsiderations," p.14.

SPEAKING OF DUST, it's begun to settle in the wake of the combined **SXSW Festivals**, a bit more contained and relaxed than last year, but with plenty of highlights, including **Snoop Dogg**, **Grumpy Cat**, a passel of sparkling films, and the semi-reincarnation of the **Legendary Doug Sahm**.

TRAVIS CO. DISTRICT Judge **Gisela Triana** was among the 42 **DWI** suspects ordered to draw blood during APD's "**no refusal**" weekend during the days of SXSW. Triana, 48, was pulled over for speeding through South Austin on Friday; she acknowledged she'd been drinking, and police found a Mike's Hard Lemonade bottle in her car. Triana's been a civil judge within the county since 2005.

UT SYSTEM REGENTS apparently lost their first choice to succeed Bill Powers as president of UT-Austin when Oxford University Vice-Chancellor Andrew Hamilton accepted the presidency of NYU. UT's executive vice president and provost, Gregory Fenves, is now reportedly the leading candidate.

THE TEXAS HOUSE Appropriations Committee sent its \$209.8 billion draft budget to the full House Tuesday, with \$8 billion still to be split between tax cuts, transportation, education, and every other pressing financial issue anyone wants to fight for.

SEN. TED CRUZ kicked off a presidential campaign this week at Jerry Falwell's fundamentalist **Liberty University**, saying he'd repeal **Obamacare** (despite recently announcing he'll enroll in the program), end the **IRS**, and forget all about that **global warming** nonsense. Let the GOP circus begin.

ALABAMA JUDGE ROY Moore polluted the Capitol with his reactionary opinions on **same-sex marriage**, claiming to speak for God, along with the predictable collection of right-wing politicians and demagogic preachers. Lubbock state Sen. **Charles Perry** said, "Apathy is one of Satan's best tools" – perhaps he should have looked in a mirror.

AMID THE LGBT hate stewing at the Capitol, Austin residents and plaintiffs in the Texas marriage equality case, Nicole Dimetman and Cleo DeLeon, welcomed their second child. However, a pregnancy complication gave the couple reason for alarm: "A day that should have been one of the happiest of our life was terrifying for Cleo," said Dimetman. "If I had not made it through the childbirth, Cleo would not have been our daughter's legal mother because her name is not allowed on the birth certificate in Texas."

TO ATTACK INSTITUTIONAL RACISM, YOU MIGHT PICK AN ACTUAL TARGET

I've been trying to decide which fleeting cultural phenomenon is more ridiculous: last week's knuckleheaded attempt by a drunk-attorney (aka "DWIbadass") to pro-

test racism by posting racist stickers on several Eastside neighborhood businesses, or the subsequent online campaign by his sycophants to defend his actions as somehow "stirring the conversation" on Eastside gentrification, or (even more absurdly) as an "art piece" calling attention to official and public hypocrisy over Austin's rising land prices and their

effects on working-class and poor people, especially minorities. Before Lawyer Looney YouTube-tagged (or so he claims) those Eastside businesses, the folly goes, nobody in town was even aware that housing prices and property taxes are rising, and certainly nobody was talking about it.

That's nutty enough as it stands – the sort of witless cliches spouted by the Pantsless

Pundit about "the way shit works" are only possible because Austinites, official and otherwise, have been lamenting, brainstorming, and strategizing over rising prices and gentrification for years, trying (without dramatic success) to blunt the edge of rapid population growth. But it seems to have occurred to very few of the Nattering Nihilist's ("go into

the darkness") online army that the best way to engage that ongoing conversation might not be to attack mom-and-pop businesses (several minority-owned) in one of Austin's most racially integrated neighborhoods, and complain ("satirically," of course) that there are too many white people around.

As one of the shop owners pointed out, this looked and sounded like victim-blaming with a vengeance. It was worse than that: Because of the confused initial response to the stickers, the inevitable backlash, and sensationalist national media coverage, some of the shops incurred denunciations, threats of boycott, and worse. The reaction of Lawyer Look-at-Me and his online platoon? Variations on "Some people can't take a joke," or "We don't give a fuck."

MIRTHLESS MUGGING

The official response to the stickers was also mixed. Because the city of Austin had been falsely portrayed as officially "sponsoring" the stickers' "partition" program, both Mayor Steve Adler ("appalling and offensive display of ignorance") and City

Manager Marc Ott ("cowardly and hateful") issued denunciations. Those were partly in reaction to state Rep. Dawnna Dukes' initial inquiries, after a constituent had alerted her and Dukes was still uncertain of the details. Dukes stumbled badly in her initial response, posting a statement that if one of the businesses (Rare Trends) couldn't adequately explain the sticker, "They need to be put out of business, ASAP!"

Soon thereafter, Dukes posted updates that the businesses were in fact victims of "an act of hatred," but never removed or updated the original post, which went national when sites like Huffington Post circulated the story and included without qualification Dukes' quote about Rare Trends. Co-owner Paola Ortiz Moore demanded a retraction and apology, but Dukes has thus far declined, instead posting several conciliatory statements, e.g.: "support the community and its businesses who were victims. Help everyone push back on this hatred and make the community stronger as a whole." One hopes that advice can be personally fulfilled.

On the other hand, when no one was yet taking credit for the tagging, Dukes nailed it when she speculated that whoever had done so was "a narcissist and a bully." In his underwear, Attorney "Trenchant Analysis" directly attacked Dukes for supposedly not "getting the joke." On that subject, local actor/director Rudy Ramirez aptly posted, "Yeah. I got that. Still not funny. Still bringing back years of trauma around exclusion and banishment from home spaces. Thanks, asshole."

MISSION UNACCOMPLISHED

If you were indeed a self-appointed "culture jammer" looking for a "whites only" target to satirize in Austin, presumably you would look quite a bit further west than Central East Austin. Tarrytown, Pemberton Heights, Northwest Hills (or even original white-flight areas like West Lake Hills) might not be "littered with white hipsters," but they certainly include plenty of establishments much more visibly (if not legally) "whites only" than El Chilito, Sugar Mama's, or the Counter Cafe. More importantly, those neighborhoods (and homeowners) have benefited for decades from exclusionary zoning codes and development practices that block most attempts to increase the supply of housing affordable for working people, whatever their race.

Austin's working people have to live somewhere, so they find still affordable neighborhoods, and that trend then dominoes the same pressure on housing prices in those neighborhoods. It's hardly a productive response – whether you call it "applying the technology" or "not giving a fuck" – to attack the folks at the bottom of this process, set a match to the gasoline of racial hatred, and applaud the result – while pretending to be above it all.

Nobody gets a free pass on history, and we're *all* in this together.

Spring Has Sprung

SUNSHINE, BLUEBONNETS ... AND MORE EVENTS THAN IMAGINABLE ...

Whew. **SXSW** rolled through, a good time was had by all, we're exhausted, and now the city can settle back down to a normal routine. Right?

Well, not so much, because the special events come fast and furious in Austin's spring festival season. They've already started, in fact, as the 88th annual **Clyde Littlefield Texas Relays**, one of the two or three top track and field events in the U.S., got underway Wednesday, and continue through Saturday, March 28 at UT's Mike A. Myers Stadium. It's free admission Thursday; tickets for the marquee events Friday and Saturday range from \$10 to \$40 for all-session reserved seating. See www.texassports. com for the full schedule.


And for the 10th straight year, the Austin

Urban Music Festival will be held over two full days at Auditorium Shores on the same weekend as the Relays: Fri.-Sat., March 27-28. See our Music Recommendeds on p.66, or www.austinurbanmusicfestival.com for full info.

The fifth annual **Honk!TX Festival** of community street bands is back this weekend as well, March 26-29. It kicks

off Thursday, 7:30pm-2am, with the **Brass Band Blitz Benefit!** at Red 7. Six bands play, with the \$10 admission going directly to the visiting bands.

Friday are the free **Underserved Community Shows**, taking place noon-5pm at Front Steps/ARCH, Boys & Girls Clubs of Austin, Rosedale School, the Thinkery, and the Program for Arts & Disabilities Art in the Park Festival at the Mexican American Cultural Center, 600 River St. Friday evening, 6-10pm, are **SoCo shows** at Jo's Coffee, the Snack Bar, and St. Vincent de Paul. And on Saturday, bands will be performing nonstop



11:30am-8pm in Adams/Hemphill Park area, near 29th and Fruth Street, at Spider House Amphitheater, Spider House Parking Lot, Trudy's Back Wall, Grove/Triangle, and Adams Park. And for Sunday's finale, the **East Austin Parade** rolls at noon from Pan-American Park at Third & Chicon, marching their musical way through East Austin and returning to Pan-Am Park for the annual closing **gala all-band revue**, starting around 1:30pm. See full band lineup, locations, and times at www.honktx.org.

No rest for the weary, because the everexpanding **Fusebox Festival** is up the next week. There's way too much going on to get into here, but I will draw your attention to a couple of events that have civic connections

> and require a little pre-planning: *The Trees of Govalle* is a presentation by **Forklift Danceworks**, in conjunction with Fusebox and the city's **Urban Forestry Division**, "a one-of-a-kind performance featuring the Urban Forestry crews and the trees of Govalle Park," with performances on the last two nights of Fusebox, Sat.-Sun., April 11-12, at 8pm at

Govalle Park, 5200 Bolm. It's part of the **thinkEAST Living Charrette** project and will take place the last two nights of the festival. Directed by **Allison Orr** and **Krissie Marty**, with original music by **Graham Reynolds**, the event is free, but reservations are required (see www.forkliftdanceworks.org), and Forklift's events always sell out.

Forklift encourages attendees to arrive early and bring a **soil sample** – which may sound weird, unless you also know about the **Soil Kitchen**, another offbeat Fusebox project, presented with the **Austin Brownfields Revitalization Office**, part of the Austin Resource Recovery department. The Kitchen will offer free soil testing, Fri.-Sun., April 10-12, 10am-6pm, at 1098 Jain. in East Austin. Representatives from the city, the EPA, and Texas A&M's AgriLife Extension Service, will be on hand to test soil for the presence of heavy metals and soil nutrients, while other city staffers provide demos on building raised beds and setting up home composting systems. There's a fairly detailed regimen for the soil testing; see info at www. austintexas.gov/soilkitchen.

That only gets us through mid-April, but there's also **Old Settler's Fest, Moontower Comedy, Levitation** (formerly known as **Psych Fest), Fashion Week, Pachanga Fest, Chaos in Tejas, QueerBomb**, and the **X Games** all coming up pretty much back-toback, so, pick your spots, keep your powder dry, and get some sleep when you can.

There is some routine city business going on, though: the long-anticipated City Council committees began to meet in earnest this past week, with some weighty business on their agendas, no less. Audit & Finance met Wednesday, with Mayor Adler's controversial proposal for **new and expanded** Council staffing first on the agenda. The committee voted to recommend a modified proposal: 12 new staffers, one for each CM, and two for the mayor. No word at press time on when that might be going to the full Council for consideration. Also meeting for the first time that same day were Housing, Mobility, and Open Space; by week's end, I believe all 10 committees will have their first meetings under their belts. All of these meetings are being shown live at the city's www.austintexas.gov/atxn site, and are archived there as well. Happy viewing.



Paying Out of Pocket for Autism

CITY HEALTH INSURANCE PLAN LEAVES EMPLOYEES WITHOUT NEEDED COVERAGE



In July 2013, four months after her family's life was changed forever, **Lisa Whitted** learned that the older of her two children had been diagnosed with autism. The news was not surprising – 2-year-old **Quintin** had begun reverting into his own cognitively uneven mind – but it introduced another element to an already emotional household.

That March, on the first morning of the month, her husband Jonathan, an Austin Police Department officer of nearly four years at the time, shot and killed 70-year-old John Schaefer after an armed altercation on Schaefer's property. A grand jury declined to indict Jonathan in the shooting, and he received no departmental discipline. Last month, Schaefer's son filed a lawsuit against APD and the officer. On administrative leave (departmental policy after an officer exercises lethal force), Jonathan had to wrestle with the reality that he was directly responsible for taking a man's life. And Lisa, as she admits, would "have to come to terms with the fact that I am married to and love someone who killed someone."

The two realities – their son's diagnosis and the emotional aftereffects of Schaefer's shooting – became even starker when the Whitteds learned Quintin's recommended treatment: "advanced behavior analysis," a physiological intervention program demonstrated to provide substantial gains to the social and adaptive behaviors of diagnosed children (and some adults). ABA treatment can take as little as four hours per week or, in truly unique cases, upwards of 40. Quintin was recommended 10. Doctors couldn't guarantee results, but the Whitteds felt it was their only hope.

The week of Quintin's diagnosis, Lisa learned through city human resources that her husband's APD-affiliated health care package did not provide coverage for ABA. Federal ERISA laws (Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974) permit selffunded municipal health plans to circumvent state law and provide their own amended benefits packages. **Towers Watson**, an employee benefits consulting firm in Northwest Austin, had determined that covering ABA wouldn't be cost productive, Lisa would eventually learn. Treatment would have to come out-of-pocket – Jonathan's APD salary.

Except Jonathan's salary was already spread thin supporting his wife and two kids (their second child, Juniper, now 2-anda-half, was diagnosed with autism last August), and a mortgage. He couldn't pick up overtime pay during the six weeks of administrative leave. Quintin's ABA treatment cost \$700 every week. The Whitteds refinanced their cars, emptied their savings, and maxed out credit cards. Jonathan worked massive overtime loads - forgoing needed post-traumatic therapy - when he did return to duty. And Lisa, who'd assumed the role of single parent while Jonathan worked overtime, tried to make sense of how a method of treatment so essential to her children's well-being could be omitted from the city's health care coverage.

In the spring of 2014, the Whitteds came into contact with **Imagine a Way**, a local assembly of philanthropists who help families struck by autism pay for necessary health care. The group funds all necessary treatments for participating children until age 6 – be it speech therapy, occupational therapy, music therapy, or ABA. Quintin reaped the benefits almost immediately, and so did Juniper that August after diagnosis.

That same month, through **Ann Heart**, president of the **Autism Society of Central Texas**, Lisa met **Jacqueline Benestante**, the wife of an Austin firefighter and mother

COUNCIL: RECYCLED RECONSIDERATIONS

City Council meets today (March 26) at the belated start time of 11am, with a relatively modest agenda of 51 items, and few obvious fire-starters among them. There's the return of the previously postponed **construction manager-at-risk** decision for a parking garage at ABIA (Item 4), and the revision of the **noise ordinance** (Item 5) to allow "busking" solicitation in certain areas of Downtown. In the current working pattern of the new Council – never doing today what they can put off for a few weeks – the former may get bounced to another committee, and on the latter, the **Economic**

Development Department has asked for a withdrawal for a legal review and also a round of committee discussion. There are also a brace of pending contracts of various sorts, and a half-dozen zoning cases (not yet

separated out to their own meeting, although that can depend on how time-hooked the cases might be).

Nevertheless, one thing we've learned from this new Council is that the length of the agenda provides only a guess on the length of the meeting. A glance at Council's **"Questions and Answers**" report – in which they submit background questions to staff in advance of an upcoming meeting – suggests that there will be plenty of gristle-chewing, especially on contracts that one would hope departmental staff have actually been hired to manage. Thus far, Council appears to prefer doing much of the managing itself.

This week, for example, District 10 Council Member **Sheri Gallo** wants to know whether certain subcontracted services – for **land surveying** (Item 3) and for **Austin Water** maintenance (Item 18) – couldn't be moved in-house at a savings (although D5 CM **Ann Kitchen** is wondering whether the maintenance workers have access to health insurance – likely one of the reasons it's a subcontract, and a question submitted to staff earlier for policy review). Gallo also wants to know if the nearby neighborhood associations support the "busking" ordinance (a question probably rendered temporarily moot by the request for withdrawal).

There are also several questions concerning the pending lease renewal for the Library Department's **Recycled Reads** resale shop on Burnet. Gallo, D6 CM **Don Zimmerman**, and D8 CM **Ellen Troxclair** all want to know more about the book resale and recycling shop. That's a little odd, since the *Library Journal* just named the Austin Library's **Mindy Reed** a "Mover and Shaker," "because of her commitment to the profession and to library sustainability as an innovator in library weeding practices." The city's press release continues, "Since opening in 2009, Recycled Reads has kept over 1,150 tons of material out of the landfill while raising funds for the Library. In 2014, Recycled Reads became a national model for library sustainability with its [U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services]-funded project, Sprouting Green Weeding Practices." (Presumably, that information will be included in Council's backup documents.)

Also: There are several questions suggesting that this or that item be sent to committee for further review.

It's Fashion Week, Safe Digging Month, and Million Mile Month (April: "a challenge to complete one million miles of physical activity, together as one collective community, in one month"). The musical honoree, fresh from her appearance at the Austin Music Awards, is singer-songwriter Carson McHone. – Michael King to a 10-year-old with autism. For four years before Lisa's efforts, Benestante made such a racket trying to get ABA treatment on the city's health care plan that the employee benefits manager who dealt with Lisa once asked her if she was Jacquie.

Lisa wasn't, but she was glad to have finally met her. Benestante had data, price points, endorsements, and figures that suggested Towers Watson's cost estimates were inflated. ABA treatment could cost the city \$1 million, *if* every patient requires 40 hours. But the actual figure is merely a fraction of that. Since August 2013, Quintin has received 10 hours of treatment every week; his sister Juniper gets only four.

In fact, data provided by Autism Speaks reports that costs associated with autism treatment often fall well below governmental allocations. South Carolina, Louisiana, and Arizona each made serious overestimates, compared to actual claims. Most strikingly, one year in South Carolina saw only \$856,000 spent of an initial \$10.6 million estimated to cover autism - a difference of 1,237%. Figures from 2014 indicate that only 17 children in the COA health plan between the ages of 1 and 9 suffer from autism, and only 48 individuals in total. Employees in the Austin Independent School District receive coverage for ABA, as do those covered by Travis County.

Last September, Lisa Whitted and Benestante campaigned to get ABA coverage added to the city budget, but they were told their efforts were too late for this year. They've since received the support of the **Austin Firefighters** and **Police** associations, as well as the **Mayor's Committee for People With Disabilities**.

In late January, Benestante ran into Council Member **Delia Garza**, a former firefighter, at a fundraiser event thrown by the wife of a former colleague. "She bent my ear a little bit," remembers Garza. "I couldn't believe that the city didn't cover these types of benefits." The two agreed that Benestante should meet with Garza's staffers. "After doing a bunch of research," continues Garza, "it just didn't seem that it's as costprohibitive as the city's saying that it is."

Last month, Garza began her plan to get coverage for ABA treatment included in the city budget, and in April, she will present a resolution to the Health & Human Services Committee. Council Member **Ann Kitchen** has been supportive, as has Mayor Pro-Tem **Kathie Tovo**. "There's more awareness toward it now," says Garza of autism. "I think everybody should have as much health care as they can get."

One need look no further for advantages of advanced behavioral analysis than the Whitteds' two kids, Quintin and Juniper. Socially repressed when she was younger, Juniper's now getting invited to other kids' birthday parties. Even Quintin is beginning to turn a corner.

"At his lowest, this was a kid who sat in a corner spinning lids," said Whitted. "Spent all day crying, clawing, scratching, and biting. ... Now, he's starting to figure certain things out." - Chase Hoffberger



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
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Contested Territory FALLOUT CONTINUES AFTER EASTSIDE BUSINESSES TAGGED WITH RACIST STICKERS


Sometime in the early morning hours of Wednesday, March 18, some person or persons tagged several East Austin businesses with what appeared to be official stickers declaring that the shops were "**exclusively for WHITE PEOPLE**," and claiming sponsorship by a nonexistent city of Austin "Contemporary Partition and Restoration Program." The signs also supposedly established a limit of "a maximum of **5 colored** customers," with the added proviso, "**colored** BOH [back of house] staff accepted."

At first, it was unclear who might have placed the stickers. Over the next couple of days, local defense attorney **Adam Reposa** (aka the "DWI King") posted YouTube videos indirectly claiming the action, describing them as anti-racist protests against gentrification, and denouncing anyone who didn't immediately understand his intentions as "stupid," in incoherent rants that went on to advise viewers not to "give a fuck" and to "apply the technology."

Initially, a few people had indeed read the stickers literally - a Facebook post posted by a passerby deploring racism and the city's supposed sponsorship quickly went viral, and state Rep. **Dawnna Dukes** followed with a post saying her office was investigating and that officials had informed her that the city was not involved. (At that time, she identified only one store: the Rare Trends clothing store on East 12th.) Dukes added that *if* the store could not adequately explain the source of the stickers, "They need to be put out of business." Within hours, Dukes had followed with several posts saying the businesses involved had in fact been the victims of a vicious prank: "Each and every business that was tagged with a sticker is victim to an act of hatred." But her initial post remained online, and as the story quickly broke nationally, many media outlets - notably the Huffington Post - made no such distinctions, even headlining without qualification Dukes' incomplete statement: "They need to be put out of business."

In addition to Rare Trends, other businesses tagged with the stickers included **El Chile** restaurant, **El Chilito Tacos y Cafe**, **Windmill Bicycles**, **Sugar Mama's Bakeshop**, and **Counter Cafe**.

Caroline Gray, director of sales and marketing for Rare Trends, said the staff hadn't noticed the sticker (placed on a display window) at first, and was only made aware of it by phoned-in complaints – it was taken down and later given to police. On its own Facebook page, Rare Trends posted: "We were victims of an outrageous vandalism act occurring



in many East Austin businesses. Rare Trends does not or will never discriminate against any person regardless of their age, ethnicity, or religious beliefs."

Similar statements were posted by other businesses, notably Sugar Mama's: "It is the beauty and diversity of Austin that has been the cornerstone to our success in this incredible city. We have sought a staff that represents inclusion and we serve two unique neighborhoods that have been shaped and characterized by their distinctive communities."

A day or two later, owners and employees of the businesses – while deploring the stickers – told the *Chronicle* that most of their customers had been supportive. In particular, **Sarah Goeth** of Windmill Bicycles said that among the well-wishers was District 1 City Council Member **Ora Houston**, who stopped by the shop to say she is glad Windmill is a neighbor. "She was wonderful," Goeth said. "Beyond that, we'd just like the whole thing to die down." The owners of Sugar Mama's reacted more strongly, considering the stickers a direct insult to their multi-racial staff and customers. Co-owner **Olivia Guerra O'Neal** (whose family is also multiracial) posted to Instagram that she considered the stickers a "hate crime." She says she received many supportive responses, but also some angry reactions and a few threats.

And because of the Dukes post and the consequent national news coverage, Rare Trends was receiving hostile calls and social media posts throughout Wednesday and Thursday, and owner **Paola Ortiz Moore** was extremely disappointed with her state rep. "How can a State Representative go to Facebook and rant and slander a business in her community, before checking the facts?" Ortiz Moore posted. "We design for women, ALL women, that's what we love doing. Instead today we have been putting out a fire that wasn't caused by us." She asked Dukes for a retraction and public apology, but Dukes told the *Chronicle* that she had only "posted a hypothetical," said Ortiz Moore was overreacting, and pointed to her several subsequent posts defending all the businesses.

After Ortiz Moore and Dukes' staff exchanged several phone calls – including at least some discussion of potential legal action – Dukes took her private Facebook page, posting that Ortiz Moore's distortions of her intentions were making it impossible to move forward. Ortiz Moore told the *Chronicle* that Dukes was refusing to acknowledge the damage that her initial post was doing to Ortiz Moore's business and reputation, even putting her staff at risk. Dukes responded that Ortiz Moore seemed unaware of the history of "whites only" rhetoric in U.S. history, and that Dukes' initial response – like that of several African-American residents – had been outrage at the calling up of that racist history. As of earlier this week, the disagreement had not been resolved.

Meanwhile, Reposa had initially posted a video ("The Primary Application") of himself at home in his underwear, denouncing the initial reaction to the stickers (insisting they represented a "trenchant analysis" of gentrification and racism), calling Dukes "dumb" and "stupid," and urg-ing viewers to "apply the technology" and "go into the darkness and not give a fuck." When that video went unnoticed, he posted another – this one called "Why I did it" – of himself, shirtless, in front of Sugar Mama's at night, dismissing the angry reactions of the businesses and employees as ignorant, and reiterating, "I don't give a fuck, look at me." Judging from subsequent online and media reaction, many did.

Reposa was accompanied by whoever was shooting the videos, and no other claimant to the stickers has come forward. A spokesman for the city of Austin said the police are investigating to determine if criminal mischief or other charges might be applicable. – *Michael King*

SEARCHING FOR THE DISAPPEARED

Members of the **Ayotzinapa 43 Caravan** – a group representing family members of Mexican students kidnapped in late September – stopped in Austin recently to recount their experiences and raise awareness about historic and ongoing human rights violations in their country.

"I was there," **Omar García**, a 24-year-old student, said in an interview before his formal talk at the **Santa Julia Catholic Church** on March 19. He was joined by **María de Jesús** in addressing the crowd of more than 50 attendees. "I was there when the bullets began to fly and I was able to hide behind a pole," he said in Spanish. "It is difficult, but I'm not experiencing trauma. Maybe after tonight, there might be those consequences."

García was acknowledging the emotional toll it takes to relive the horrific moments of last September, when police and an organized crime cartel are believed to have killed six, wounded 25 more, and kidnapped 43 students from the Raúl Isidro Burgos Rural teachers' college of Ayotzinapa. A clear account of what happened to the students has yet to be given. What is known is that about 100 students traveled to Iguala, Guerrero, to protest education reforms, and 43 were rounded up by the police and have not been seen since. The police have blamed a drug cartel; many believe the police themselves are responsible for the students' disappearance, although there is also notorious overlap between drug gangs and Mexican

police. The incident has galvanized family members to shed a broader light on systemic human rights abuses in Mexico, including the indirect complicity of the United States via the **Mérida Initiative**, in which the U.S. provides funding to Mexico to "fight organized crime and associated violence." Critics claim the funds often go to military equipment that is used by police and military forces against the Mexican citizenry.

Despite the anguish of not having seen her 18-year-old son since the violence nor knowledge of his fate, de Jesús eloquently addressed those gathered. "Para mi, no es felicidad hablar de México," she said in her native Spanish. ("For me, there is no happiness in talking of Mexico.") "But it's because



of this cause that we are here, asking for justice. ¡El pueblo unido jamás será vencido!" she concluded, leading the crowd in one of the most internationally recognized rallying cries of the working class: "The people united will never be defeated!"

"We as parents need to continue to pressure the government of [Mexican President]

FUNDRAISER PLANNED FOR JUMPOLIN

A fundraiser is scheduled at **Cenote** cafe this Saturday to help the owners of **Jumpolin** – the piñata store razed last month by new landowners – get back on their feet financially and find a new location. Jumpolin owners **Monica** and **Sergio Lejarazu** will be selling miniature piñatas and cascarones for the Easter season, each priced at \$10. The confetti-filled eggshells will come in 30-count packs, Monica Lejarazu said.

"The purpose is to raise funds so we can buy more merchandise for Easter week, which was always our best season," Monica said in a Wednesday telephone interview. The tiny piñatas – intended as festive keepsakes – will feature traditional shapes of cartoon characters, animals, and fruits, she said. But she made a point to also include among the offerings diminutive phoenixes rising from the ashes, symbolic of the couple's personal ordeal.

Business partners **Jordan French** and **Darius Fisher** of **F&F Real Estate Ventures** commissioned a wrecking crew in the early morning hours of Feb. 12 to demolish the longstanding store at 1401 E. Cesar Chavez in their attempts to clear the lot for a SXSW-timed event. The Lejarazus claim the land-owners – who bought the property in October – gave them no notice to the demolition

(their piñata inventory was still inside), and have since retained an attorney to sue the landlords (see "Jumpolin & Gentrification Backlash," March 13). They had more than two years left on their lease as part of a five-year lease renewal from their previous landlord.


Cenote is located just a healthy stone's throw from the former Jumpolin site. Cafe co-owner **Cody Symington** expressed his empathy for the Lejarazus in a previous interview with the *Chronicle*, indicating he had offered his site for a possible fundraiser to assist them. The Lejarazus have temporarily relocated to 4926 E. Cesar Chavez at a property owned by community leader **Rosa Santis**, who offered the site as temporary dwelling for two months.

But it's already been one month since the destruction of their business, Monica noted, and the couple now must bolster their search for a new business base while trying to stay financially afloat. Already, the search for a new site in the familiar terrain where the couple had established their clientele for eight years before the unexpected demolition is proving challenging, said Monica. Conversations she was having with one property owner in the East Cesar Chavez neighborhood suddenly ceased when she indicated the couple's affordability price range would be between \$1,500 and \$2,800, maximum.

"I didn't hear from him after that," she said. In the years since the couple launched Jumpolin, the landscape has changed, she observed. Whereas the couple was originally paying \$800 a month for the small store that was ultimately demolished, she said rent is now in the \$2,000-3,000 range.

But she's hopeful the fundraiser – and a concurrent one at **GoFundMe** nearing \$5,000 in donations – will raise enough money to start over. This week already a good omen emerged: F&F Ventures' lawyers delivered a box filled with business documents, which was among the debris of the demolition. Inside, kept neatly in a folder, she found the dollar she had saved from the couple's first sale after launching Jumpolin. "I think it's a good sign," she said. – *Tony Cantú*

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Enrique Peña Nieto in asking for justice," she said after her formal address. It is by summoning an innate *ánimo* – the human spirit – that she is propelled to speak, she said. The same fortitude keeps alive hope that one day she might be reunited with her son: "It is with that spirit that I hope we will find each other at any moment."

The caravan was in Austin March 18-20 before departing for Dallas, its last Texas stop. From there the group will go on to Kansas City, St. Louis, St. Paul, and other cities to speak to churches and community organizations. While the incident at Ayotzinapa served as a launching pad, the tour seeks to heighten awareness of pervasive human rights abuses in Mexico, where tens of thousands of forced disappearances and more than 100,000 killings have taken place since 2006. The Ayotzinapa disappearances are also eerily reminiscent of the incident known as **Tlatelolco**, named for the site where up to 300 students and civilians were massacred by police and military forces amidst social unrest prior to the 1968 Olympics scheduled to take place in Mexico City.

The Ayotzinapa 43 have gained solidarity throughout their tour, including from the **Austin City Council** in the form of a March 12 resolution expressing support, and from the **Texas Senate** in the form of a resolution authored by all 31 members, adding the Senate's "voice to those in the international community who are deeply concerned about the missing college students from Mexico." – *Tony Cantú*

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Still All About the Money?

ENDEAVOR REAL ESTATE & WDP LOOK FOR AGREEMENT

Last June, the **Capital Metro Board** voted to award the **Plaza Saltillo** development contract to the **Endeavor Real Estate Group**, best known in Austin for developing the **Domain**, among other projects. That decision came as a blow to neighborhood advocates, including members of the **East Cesar Chavez Neighborhood Planning Team**, who had been working for some time on a proposal with a competing group, the **Saltillo Collaborative**.

Composed of **Constructive Ventures' Perry Lorenz** and **Larry Warshaw**, as well as affordable housing nonprofit developers **Foundation Communities** and **Guadalupe Neighborhood Development Corporation**, the Collaborative had also gained the endorsement of labor rights activists **Workers Defense Project**, whose **Better Builder Program** the Collaborative had pledged to join.

Lori Renteria, a member of the planning team, said she had hoped Plaza Saltillo, as envisioned by the Collaborative, "could be an international model of building a transitoriented community." One of the benefits of their plan, in her view, was that the affordable housing units would have been priced lower – with units available not only for those earning 60% of median income, but also for those at 50%, 40%, and 30% – and

would have included three- and four-bed-rooms for larger families.

At the time of the decision, the *Chronicle* reported that "Saltillo Collaborative team leader Lorenz expressed disappointment over a decision that ran counter to what neighborhood stakeholders had wanted for the site. 'When someone – or some board says – "it is not all about the money," it really means "it's all about the money," he said." (See "Plaza Saltillo Decision Comes Down to Money," June 24, 2014.)

The decision to go with Endeavor was decided by a single vote, after the Cap Metro board twice deadlocked. Then-Council Members Mike Martinez and Chris **Riley**, as well as Leander Council Member Dave Siebold, all voted for the Collaborative, while Norm Chafetz, Terry Mitchell, Beverly Silas, and Ann Stafford voted for Endeavor. John Langmore decided to switch his vote to Endeavor after its representative, Jason Thumlert, told the board that Endeavor would be willing to "entertain an agreement with that specific group [WDP] and the terms that are being proposed for the other developer as well," as Martinez put it at the time.

Nearly a year has passed, and Endeavor and WDP have yet to reach an agreement, although representatives from each organization have met. According to WDP, part of the problem was that it took a while for Endeavor representatives with the decision-making power to commit to terms to make it to the table. However, talks are now under way.

Endeavor had included living wages for workers as part of its proposal, but WDP would like to see the company agree to each of the requirements of its Better Builder Program, which include not only living wages, but also OSHA-10 safety training, workers' comp insurance, local hiring goals, and on-site monitoring. On-site monitoring by WDP would make sure that workers are being treated fairly in practice, both WDP and the planning team believe.

The planning team has passed a resolution asking "that Endeavor fulfill its commitments to form a community advisory group, work with stakeholders, and sign Workers Defense Project Better Builder certification to ensure that development of the Plaza Saltillo tract be fair, sustainable, and equitable."

Council Member **Pio Renteria**, who had argued for the Collaborative's proposal as a member of the planning team, believes Endeavor has time to agree to further worker safety standards. "They're still going through the planning process," he told the *Chronicle.* – *Amy Kamp*

Housing Ordinance Back in Effect – for Now

The status of the city's source-ofincome discrimination ordinance continues to oscillate.

The measure – meant to grant lowincome renters, including Section 8 voucher holders, wider housing opportunities – was put on hold when the **Austin**

Apartment Association filed suit, arguing that the ordinance unfairly forces landlords into government contracts. U.S. District Judge **Sam Sparks** ruled against the AAA, allowing it to take effect on Feb. 27, weeks after its initially scheduled start date. However, the Association succeeded in halting the measure once again with a temporary injun ction, granted by the **U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals** in early March, to the dismay of affordable housing advocates. Now, in yet another turn, the three-judge 5th Circuit panel vacated its ruling on Tuesday with little explanation in court filings.

Fred Fuchs, defendants' attorney with Texas RioGrande Legal Aid, said they are "ecstatic" about the 5th Circuit denial. "We are delighted and ready to move on to the next stage," Fuchs, who represents voucher holders in the case, told the *Chronicle*. Fuchs said the circuit court likely granted the injunction to "preserve the status quo" before delving into Sparks' opinion and the defendant's responses.

The AAA can appeal the ruling, but hasn't taken any action yet. In a statement, they said they are "presently evaluating our options" and remain committed to providing quality affordable housing "in a manner that does not penalize the very people whose investments are providing that housing."

Fuchs said the longer the wait the better: "The longer this ordinance remains in effect, the more you'll see landlords wondering, 'Why did we ever fight this in the first place?" – Mary Tuma

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Do UT Frats Have a Race Problem?

LONGTIME LONGHORN SEES SOME IMPROVEMENT; ROOM FOR MORE

Born on the 18th anniversary of the historic U.S. Supreme Court decision, *Brown v. Board of Education*, **Richard Reddick**, an associate professor at **UT-Austin**, researches, among other things, diversity (or lack thereof) in higher education. Before becoming a professor, Reddick was a stellar student at UT in the early Nineties – a Plan II Honors student on full scholarship, who was also involved on campus as an orientation adviser, a Leadership Board member, and even a Silver Spur. Any university should've welcomed a young man like Reddick. But that wasn't always the case.

In a 2012 interview, Reddick told *The Alcalde* that "the climate could be chilly for black students." After all, during his first year on campus, a **Phi Gamma Delta** member sold shirts depicting "a Sambo-like Fiji islander," and a **Delta Tau Delta** member painted "a racial slur on the trunk of an old car that the fraternity had planned to smash after driving it in the Round-Up parade."

Fortunately, Reddick was able to find welcoming spaces on campus that enabled him to find success (he credits the Office of the Dean of Students and especially his mentors **Brenda Burt**, **Ricardo Romo**, and others).

Unfortunately, the issues that Reddick dealt with as a student didn't graduate with him, as recent events have shown. While Reddick believes that some people have made progress and have tried to address institutional racism, he laments, "Has there been systemic change? Structural change? The evidence doesn't seem to support that."

Of course, UT-Austin has made great progress regarding diversity on campus, but it's far from complete. While more diverse than the Greek community in particular, UT in general isn't representative of the state's demographics as a whole. African-Americans compose almost 14% of the national population and 12% of the Texas population, but just over 4% of the UT student body. While UT has more Latinos (around 18%) than the national average (around 17%), they're hugely underrepresented compared to the state population, which is 38% Latino.

At UT – as at many universities – most fraternities and sororities are predominantly white. From their very beginnings, exclusivity – especially regarding race, money, and power – has been part of the foundation of fraternities. Originally, they were exclusively white because of institutional segregation; UT, for example, was a legally segregated institution until the Sixties. But that doesn't excuse fraternities, which took additional steps of their own to restrict membership to white, Christian men. These restrictions weren't seriously challenged until the late Forties, and were eventually officially banned in the Sixties.

Reddick said, "Historically what's happened is that when people feel that they're excluded from fraternities, they form their own. And that's how we have historically black fraternities, that's how we have Latino fraternities, that's how we have fraternities of every other group that's been historically excluded. You don't try to fix them from within, you make your own."

Because outsiders haven't been able to change fraternities, the organizations have maintained a sort of social isolation.



Christian Umbria Smith of Longhorn LULAC, the UT chapter of the **League of United Latin American Citizens**, told the *Chronicle*, "It's a matter of who is composing these groups and how their lives are unaffected by race, that then gives them the ignorance to how their actions affect minority groups."

There are economic factors contributing to the segregation as well. Joining a fraternity can cost more than tuition. Membership in most organizations costs thousands of dollars: UT's Fiji, for example, charges \$6,000, and thousands more for room and board for those living at the house. Furthermore, West Campus, where most Greek houses are located, "has long been expensive and recently became enormously more expensive," as city demographer **Ryan Robinson** told *The Daily Texan* in 2012. Because wealth still correlates with race, many black and Latino students are unable to afford to live in the neighborhood – thus reinforcing the social isolation of the Greek community.

As Smith said, "Money affords a certain kind of privilege that allows one not to have to worry about racial issues and therefore, sensitivity training, either from their families or through actual courses, are not necessary for their kind of lifestyle. So they're more prone to these kind of incidences when they don't think about what they're doing and how it affects other groups." While acknowledging that "the actions of a few cannot represent the whole," Smith says, "we can't ignore the fact that these issues are predominantly coming out of the Greek community."

All these factors reinforce the exclusionary nature of fraternities, which contributes to the difficulty of changing such an environment. Reddick said, "I really do worry about what happens in spaces that are the domain of privileged white men, because those places aren't often penetrated by people who aren't privileged white men. So unless other privileged white men see this as a problem or something that needs to be fixed, it will probably never improve. That's the sobering idea about this whole thing."

As an educator himself, Reddick believes that education on these issues is extremely important. Speaking of the **University of Oklahoma SAE** video that resulted in the fraternity being shut down by the school, he said, "These guys were talking about lynching like, you know, 'It's no big thing, it's just a private chant,' instead of saying, 'My God, this is such an offensive, horrific part of American history.' You know, how much do

UT's Student Government Winners Mix Substance With Satire

For a generation raised by **Jon Stewart** and **Stephen Colbert**, it's only fitting that two satirical candidates won the student government election at **UT-Austin**, which has one of the largest student bodies in the country.

President Xavier Rotnofsky and Vice President Rohit Mandalapu, editors of UT's humor newspaper, the Texas Travesty,* are now at the helm of the university's student government, perhaps the most historic (or at least, comically memorable) election winners since Hank the Hallucination – a cartoon – beat now-noted political consultant Paul Begala in 1982. (Due to questionable circumstances, Hank never took office.)

Candidates **Braydon Jones** and **Kimia Dargahi** got 46% of the vote in the first round of voting – less than a majority – so the 26% support for Rotnofsky-Mandalapu, affectionately known as **RotMan**, was enough to force a run-off. Then, with the support of social media, RotMan won 59% of the 9,445 run-off votes – a record turnout. Rotnofsky said that the support was "very nice," and added, "I didn't know people liked me or found me attractive until now." Mandalapu, on the other hand, did not comment due to a fear that he is being bugged. The duo was supported by college comedy site, **Total Frat Move**, who shared RotMan's first campaign video as well as their later attack ad (in which they attacked themselves) – notable because neither Rotnofsky nor Mandalapu have Greek connections, which have seemingly been a requirement in previous SG elections.

The *Travesty* candidates unquestionably benefited from their comedic take, which included campaign platforms promising that UT President **Bill Powers** will no longer be president of the university after their term – which, of course, will happen regardless. They also stressed the importance of transparency in student government, "mandating everyone in student government wear only cellophane so that they can be perfectly see-through," according to their website **LetsTalkTexas.biz**, a parody of their opponents' **LetsTalkTexas.org** campaign site.

But their jokes were far from empty. The pair has already filed a student government resolution that would support the removal of the **Jefferson Davis statue** from campus, which was one of their original campaign points. The resolution is consistent with the campaign, addressing serious concerns of the student body while incorporating humor. According to **The Daily Texan**, the resolution included multiple pages of fact-based arguments about the statue's removal, but also argued that former Nickelodeon stars Drake & Josh "would have never supported a Jefferson Davis statue on the program." The two have also pledged to join forces with other student groups to oppose **campus carry** legislation (Mandalapu testified at a recent House committee hearing against the bill).

Neither Rotnofsky nor Mandalapu had anticipated winning, so questions remain about how exactly the new administration will conduct business and whether they'll continue their humorous approach. On the topic, Rotnofsky told the Chronicle, "We're going to try and get work done while maintaining a sense of humor about ourselves. People respond to comedy and honesty." Daily Texan columnist Jordan Shenhar explained their allure: "They lace their comedy with undertones of constructive idealism, rather than destructive cynicism. It isn't that Rotnofsky and Mandalapu want to turn student government into a joke. They just recognize that, as far as most of the student body is concerned, student government is already perceived as a joke." What can be expected from the new executive alliance in the short-term? Mandalapu said, "We're getting coffee with many different people in student government. Apparently that's where a lot of SG work gets done - over coffee, a diuretic substance that loosens your bowels." - Mac McCann

they know about it?" For this reason, Reddick recommends that "every organization should have had some level of training before these things happen."

Reddick emphasized the importance of convergence in addressing these problems, saying it needs to be more than just fraternity members and students of color who are paying attention to these issues. And it's not just frat parties; there are lots of microaggressions on campus and in general society too. "The minute it becomes your problem, as well as the next guy's problem, is the minute it compels a change," he said.

"The problem's not going to fix itself," especially if only outsiders are upset about it, Reddick said. "But if people from the organization say, 'We see a problem with this and we're going to actually take steps to fix this,' then there's hope for making it better." -Mac McCann



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Procedures, but in what could be an ominous sign for its progress, it wasn't on the agenda for its March 23 meeting. Brewery advocacy group **Open the Taps** now says it has been told by Thompson's staff that she will not push for a hearing.

In even better news for beer fans, Eltife has filed **Senate Bill 1386**, helping the nascent **beer tourism** industry: If passed, visitors to a brewery producing less than 225,000 barrels a year could take home up to 36 pints a month. The bill analysis argues that "this benefits retailers and distributors by allowing Texas craft brewers the ability to better market their products." It also means that brewery tours in Texas will be on the same footing as winery tours, or as brewery tours are in other states.

Anti-frackers and advocates for local control over oil drilling were furious after the House Energy Resources **Committee** hearing on **HB 40**, a measure that would pre-empt local regulations over fracking such as those passed by voters in Denton last year. Chair Drew Darby, R-San Angelo, let lobbyists and representatives of the oil and gas industry dominate the first

THINKING ABOUT DRINKING

Don't mess with **craft breweries**. That's a lesson Rep. **Senfronia Thompson**, D-Houston, learned this week after filing, then backpedaling on, a bill that would cut how much small breweries can sell directly.

Since Prohibition, alcohol distribution in Texas has been a three-tiered structure: The **breweries** brew, the **distributors** distribute, and the **retailers** retail. The positive of the arrangement is that it ended the monopoly power of the big breweries over bar owners and liquor stores, but the downside was that the big distributors ended up in a cozy relationship with the big breweries.

In 1993 new laws allowed **brewpubs** (which could sell on-site, but not to retailers) and **microbreweries** (which could sell offsite, but not directly to customers). Then in 2013, after years of bipartisan pressure, Sen. **Kevin Eltife**, R-Tyler, authored a raft of bills allowing brewpubs to sell a portion of their output off-site, and let small breweries, producing less than 125,000 barrels a year, sell 40.000 barrels without going through a distributor - scarcely a threat to Anheuser-Busch, but enough to give these small firms a big push. This year, Thompson proposed putting the bung back in the barrel. On March 17, she filed House Bill 3389, cutting that self-distribution cap by 87.5%, to 5,000 barrel per annum maximum. Cue howls of protest from the brewers, many of whom already sell more than 5,000 barrels directly. Thompson quickly issued a brief statement saying that she felt the purpose of the 2013 bills was to integrate craft brewers into the three-tiered system, and that there was "a movement afoot" to break the carefully crafted agreement between these new firms and the old institutions. Her bill has been sent to the House Licensing & Administrative

HB 2918

Criticism has hit state Rep. **Jason Villalba**, R-Dallas, from all corners since his March 10 filing of HB 2918, which would limit every Texan's ability to peacefully film police activity (and restrict citizens not affiliated with certain types of media outlets even further), but the Dallas Republican maintains that those casting stones should wait – just one more goddamn minute – until Villalba's had the opportunity to properly file a committee substitute.

In its initial form, HB 2918 amends Section 38.15 of the **Texas Penal Code** to restrict those filming police activity to 25 feet of distance between the person and the officer (those carrying concealed handguns must back up another 100 feet). Exceptions are made for news media outlets, though the definition's somewhat archaic; under Villalba's language even an online outlet like the Texas Tribune would get left out.

Villalba called the narrow terms of inclusion "an oversight" when reached by telephone last Thursday, saying that he didn't properly vet the bill's language when it passed through his desk. He added that he originally "perceived" that the definition of "news media" would include online news sources.

"What we were trying to avoid was the independent blogger who is seeking more to advocate than actually report," he said. "That, really, is the center of the legislation. We weren't trying to limit anyone's ability to film officers and keep them accountable. All we're trying to do is give the officers a little bit of breathing room to do their jobs and not be interrupted by this group of agitators – a small group of individuals who are not interested in reporting or keeping people accountable, but rather want to disrupt the process of police being able to do their job."

Who falls under the category of "agitator" might be less clear than "news media." Advances in technology have made everybody with a cell phone able to film police, and Villalba makes no effort to contest the First Amendment's protection of every American's right to record police. In addition to including online outlets in the legislation, Villalba said he also intends to specifically include situations in which the individual being addressed by the police officer is able to record from any distance.

"If I'm pulled over in my automobile and I want to be sure to get my officer on video, we don't want to restrict that," he said. "This is for outside, third-party entities who are hoping to disrupt the process.

"We don't want to restrict anyone's ability to record police officers doing their job," he added. "All we're asking is, 'Can you step back from being two feet in front of the officer's face with your camera?' We've asked for 25. That figure comes from standard police training protocol when they secure an area with crime scene tape. If that [distance] is too much for people, that's something we can talk about. If it needs to go back to 15, we can get to that." – Chase Hoffberger

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Not Clean Enough

CENTEX FACING MORE STRINGENT AIR STANDARDS

The thing about air pollution is that it ments can last for even 20 years after doesn't stay put. Emissions from Central Texas cars, power plants, and refineries make their way to places downwind - often San Antonio, sometimes Temple. At the same time, emissions created elsewhere end up here. Often they blow in from the north (as far away as the Ohio River Valley) or the south/southeast. For instance, Louisiana will soon be responsible for 2 parts per billion of Central Texas' groundlevel ozone (O₃), according to Environmental Protection Agency data. That may not seem like much, but it's enough to nudge the region into "nonattainment" of EPA standards - a designation that could have economic consequences for decades. According to Andrew Hoekzema, air quality program manager for the Capital Area Council of Governments, that close-call scenario is exactly what Central Texas may be facing under new O3 standards proposed by EPA.

Based on a new assessment of health impacts, the EPA has proposed a 65-to-70ppb limit on O_3 levels (down from the current 75ppb), to take effect in 2017. According to CAPCOG's analysis, Central Texas is poised to meet a 70ppb standard given an overall downward trend in O_3 . However, the region will be off by just a hair if EPA implements the more stringent standard (65ppb). Not only will O₃ levels miss the mark by just 2ppb, but they will likely do so for just one monitoring season. "Looking right now, we will miss it by a year," says Hoekzema. "We will be over 65 by the end of 2016, but we may be able to reach 65 by 2017." (See graph.)

Although O₃ will continue trending downward, that brief juncture spent in breach of the standard could have significant consequences. A nonattainment designation would subject the Austin-Round Rock metropolitan statistical area to new planning restrictions, such as emissionsoffset requirements of 110% or more, says Hoekzema. Such requirements could be costly enough to limit growth in the region. "Samsung has, for instance, indicated that their recent expansion would not have occurred here had our area been designated nonattainment," savs Hoekzema.

While these restrictions would likely be short-lived, others would not. Under transportation conformity requirements, for instance, projects such as highway construction would be subject to expensive and time-consuming analyses. According to Hoekzema, amendments to the regional transportation plan "that would take maybe a month or two under an attainment situation would now take nine months to a year." Moreover, once the region regained attainment status, it could be placed under a "maintenance" plan prolonging the restrictions. "Transportation conformity requirean area comes back into attainment." he savs.


For Central Texas, this situation would be a particularly bitter pill to swallow. Through their participation in the Clean Air Coalition, the jurisdictions of the five-county, 13-city MSA have worked together for 15 years to improve air quality. They have implemented a variety of programs intended to keep the region in attainment (e.g., idling restrictions, rideshare programs, and energy conservation measures). Some programs, such as vehicle emissions testing, are "frankly well beyond what would be required even under a nonattainment designation," says Hoekzema. For such efforts, CAC and CAPCOG have

been recognized as a model for voluntary regional air quality planning and were honored in 2014 with an EPA Clean Air **Excellence** Award.

Still, there's room for improvement, says Sierra Club member Scott Johnson, a veteran of local air quality planning efforts. For instance, he says, idling restrictions would benefit from greater enforcement, tailpipe emissions should be more closely monitored, and funds for unproven outreach efforts should go to mitigation. Overall, he believes current strategies would be more effective given a greater focus on such improvements. "But that has not been done, much to my chagrin," he says. At an EPA hearing in Arlington in January, he spoke in support of a strengthened standard. In Central Texas, a 65ppb target would "galvanize the effort to do more to look at the existing strategies and try to improve those," he says.

Earlier this month, ahead of the March 17 deadline for public input, the CAC submitted a comment letter to EPA. Rather than weigh in on a preferred standard, the CAC requested that EPA consider adjusting how it assesses compliance. The current approach, says Hoekzema, is subject to too much variability. "If areas are popping over that line [of compliance] back and forth. that's not good for air quality planning," he says. Developed by CAPCOG staff, the recommendations are intended to create a metric less sensitive to data outliers. For example, per monitoring season, EPA allows a certain number of exceedances of the standard. CAPCOG's analysis shows that allowing just one more exceedance should keep Central Texas in attainment.

EPA might also consider simply deferring nonattainment designations for a year for areas close to the standard. After all, says Hoekzema, O₃ monitoring instruments have a 7% margin of error - the equivalent of about 4ppb. The letter also encourages EPA to implement long-delayed Clean Air Act



requirements addressing emissions traveling from other states, such as Louisiana. Finally, it asks EPA to reward good behavior – go easy on restrictions for nonattainment areas that have undergone voluntary emissions-reduction efforts, it suggests.

If the recommendations don't sway EPA, a plan B awaits in the form of a draft letter to Central Texas Congress members asking that they consider changing the CAA itself to "provide significant regulatory and economic relief for Central Texas." With an EPA ruling not expected until October, the CAC tabled discussion of the letter at its March 11 meeting. For now, the individual jurisdictions can decide whether to amend it, send it, or sit on it.

In the meantime, there is reason to believe EPA might listen to the CAC. According to CAPCOG's analysis, the recommendations do not sacrifice public health benefits achieved by the stricter O₃ standard. Moreover, says Hoekzema, other regions - having seen CAPCOG's analysis - have submitted similar recommendations to EPA. "We've gone above and beyond what's required of us under the Clean Air Act," he says. "Central Texas to some extent has earned the right to be heard by EPA on these matters." - Nora Ankrum

Big Food a Big Hoax

Near my home in **Austin. Texas**. there's an old refurbished motel with a keep-it-real attitude that is expressed right on its iconic marquee: "No additives. No preservatives. Corporate-free since 1938."

The good news is that more and more businesses across the country are adopting this attitude, providing a buy-local, un-corporate, anti-chain alternative for customers. Food shoppers and restaurant-goers, for example, have made a huge shift in recent years away from the likes of McDonald's, Pepsi, and Taco Bell, preferring upstart, independent outfits with names like The Corner, Caleb's Kola, and U.S. Taco Co.

But, uh-oh, guess who owns those little alternatives? Right - McDonald's, PepsiCo, and Taco Bell. Leave it to ethically-challenged, profiteering monopolists to grab such value-laden terms as "genuine" and "honest," empty them of any authenticity, then hurl

them back at consumers as shamefully deceptive marketing scams.

In Huntington Beach, Calif., U.S. Taco Co. poses as a hip surfer haunt, with a colorful "Day of the Dead" Mexican skull as its logo. The airy place peddles lobster tacos and other fancifuls at \$3 or \$4 each - very un-fast-foody. Nowhere is it whispered that this is a Big Chain outlet, created by a group of Taco Bell insiders. They even usurped the enterprising word "entrepreneur," stripped it of its outsider connotation, and twisted it into a corporate vanity, calling themselves "intrapreneurs."

The problem with these fabricators of "corporatized authenticity" is that reality will out them. Small and local has a genuine feel and flavor that the imitators can't sustain as they sprawl out into 1,000 and then 10,000 stores. And as they do that, it becomes obvious to customers that they've been duped and that's not a good marketing strategy.

Performers in Our Midst

IN *1,000 FOREST GORILLAS IN KANSAS*, PRIMATES INSPIRE THE ART OF LIVING by Jonelle Seitz

"You know how to measure without trying them on, right? Belly button to spine." Ellen Bartel demonstrates for Heloise Gold, holding up a pair of pants still clipped to the plastic hanger and pressing the waistband around one side of her torso. The dancerchoreographers are at Savers, the thrift store, shopping for costumes for their duet in 1,000 Forest Gorillas in Kansas, Gold's new collaboration with Natalie George. The work is inspired in part by a gorilla that came to Gold in a dream – it lounged in her studio. When Gold told Bartel about the dream, Bartel said, "You know I have a gorilla head," referring to a costume piece in her personal collection.

In their duet, Gold and Bartel will morph between human and gorilla, wallowing in the small percentage of DNA that differentiates humans from the critically endangered mountain gorilla, also known as the forest gorilla, of Africa. There is just the one gorilla head between the two dancers and no budget for a costumer, and Gold is worried: "I'm having trouble visualizing Ellen and I. I want our bodies to show, but ..." – she lifts a knee and floats an arm over her head – "casual." Bartel holds up a pair of khaki trousers. Gold raises her eyebrows: "I have a thing about khaki." Bartel considers, gets it: "Somehow khaki means that you're trainable." They decide on dress pants in blacks and grays (the kind that anyone with an office job already owns). "Slaaaacks!" They poke fun at the word, calling to each other over the dressing room wall. "We're buying slaaacks!" Gold tests a pair, reclining apelike on the fitting-room bench with one foot in the air, and sighs. "I wish we had Natalie here."

Gold and George – whose backgrounds include dance, performance art, production, and, for George, lighting design – began developing *1,000 Forest Gorillas* during a four-day artist residency last December at Pilot Balloon Church-House in Lawrence, Kansas (the program was founded by Matt Hislope and Josh Meyer of Rubber Repertory). It's difficult to say what the performance will be - or, more interestingly, what it will do - but here is a partial list of its ingredients: Gold and George's mutual fascination with the number 1,000, clinched by the street address of Pilot Balloon Church: 1000 New York St.; George's tech-box perspective of the body's interplay with light; a cast of 10 skilled performers; two adult-sized tricycles; and a kitchen, like the one on the back wall of the creative space at Pilot Balloon. Snow, which fell in Kansas. And lots of fascination with the gorillas, the world's population of which is less than 1,000. Back in rehearsal at her studio, Gold

announces, "We're going to look at the gorilla video and play a bit with gorilla movement." Gold, George, Bartel, Elaine Dove, and Jason Phelps gather around Gold's iPad as she cues up "Gorillas and Wildlife of Uganda HD," a video documenting a tourist visit to a group of gorillas (uploaded to YouTube by Fred Heiman). "They spend their days quietly, either in a leisurely search for food or relaxing in a social setting," says the narrator, a woman with a New Jersey accent, as the silverback, the dominant male, sits Buddha-like, ripping thistly plants from the ground and picking off undesirable parts before gnashing them. A female with a baby clinging to her back hair lumbers through the crowd of tourists, who yield. Gold stops the video. "The idea is not to move like gorillas but be inspired by gorillas. This is your gorilla - your very own gorilla, whatever that is."

The performers give it a try. George's gorilla places her long arms and legs carefully, like a runner at the starting line, and slowly makes her way, on all fours, into a reclining pose on one hip, her belly oriented toward the sky. Gold's gorilla is headlong and playful; at just five feet tall and mirthful, she can't help but come across as spritely, like the Tinker Bell of gorillas. It's too much for Bartel, who breaks into laughter. The group clambers upstage, where they will lounge around the kitchen appliances before exiting. "So this is the part that I'm super weirded out about," George interrupts. "I don't want to look like the dumb evolutionary chart as we stand up." Everyone agrees, and they devise a workaround.

"Let's watch the video," says Gold, who has been recording the rehearsal on her iPad. As the performers observe themselves – humans captured in the wild of gorilla-ness, in the wild of the studio – they chuckle and analyze. Bartel rubs her eyes: "My question is, how long will we be doing this?" There isn't an answer just yet, but Gold implores the cast to watch more videos of the gorillas: "They've got it together more than we do." Bartel muses, "They know how to enjoy life."

The Contemporary Austin gives new life to the place where it all began, Laguna Gloria

Austin hides its ghosts well, but if you know where to look, the spirits of the city's past residents still buzz about. They debate and dance around the Capitol as families and political advocates grace the lawn. With wispy, furrowed brows, they studiously walk across the University of Texas campus while current students keep pace in their fading steps. One studies the Contemporary Austin's newly acquired Paul McCarthy piece, a bronze sculpture of an imposing Snow White, in the Betty and Edward Marcus Sculpture Park, her ghostly face hinting at curiosity and excitement. She's gone before you can approach her. It was a glimpse of Clara Driscoll, a woman with a reputation that has stood the test of time. Or it should have

Somewhere down the line, Driscoll's remarkable history fell victim to cultural amnesia. If you know of her at all, it's probably through the Alamo, which Driscoll helped secure as a historical site, or the brief marker tucked away on the grounds of her old residence: the villa at Laguna Gloria. A Texan by way of Ireland, Driscoll was a woman who represented all the charming bawdiness and good humor of the state she called home. Her grandfather had emigrated from County Cork and fought to secure Texas' freedom in the Battle of San Jacinto. Her father and uncle, both Civil War veterans, began a multimillion-dollar ranching, banking, and commercial development business in Corpus Christi. Clara Driscoll was as Texan as they come and raised accordingly. She spoke four languages fluently and was educated in both New York and France. She published two novels before the age of 26. Her three-act comic opera Mexicana debuted in New York City and ran for 82 performances. In 1905, she handed over roughly \$75,000 in cash to secure the land around the Alamo to continue its preservation as a historical site, a project that would carry on throughout Driscoll's life. She led the Texas Democratic Party as its national committeewoman for 16 years and was an ardent supporter of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Upon her death, Time magazine was quoted: "Even for Texas, a woman like Clara Driscoll was

something. Politicians soon learned to respect her: She could drink, battle, cuss and connive with the best of them, outspend practically all of them."

She was a philanthropist, creative, and trailblazer – and wanted to give that imaginative spirit to everything she touched. It's no surprise that her Austin legacy emerged as Laguna Gloria.

The property itself possesses a prestigious background. It was originally owned by Stephen F. Austin, but he never got around to developing it. Years later, the land fell into the hands

of Hal Sevier, founding editor of the Austin American and Driscoll's husband. He and Clara designed the villa in the style of the country houses at Italy's Lake Como. They broke ground in 1914, and the villa was completed in 1916. Clara dedicated herself to the space, designing the varied landscaping motifs that still exist there today. In its heyday, Laguna Gloria hosted Texas' haut monde for political functions, dinner parties, and artistic salons, serving as the site for international events as well as respected community soirees. It represented the creative elite's ambition to bring old-world sophistication to the still-emergent state of Texas. It was Austin's aristocratic hub, and at its center was Clara.

In 1938, however, that all ended when Driscoll and Sevier divorced. Five years later, Clara gave up Laguna Gloria, donating it, along with \$5,000, to the Texas Fine Arts Association, with the intent of having the land used "as a Museum to bring pleasure in the appreciation of art to the people of Texas." The TFAA had been established 32 years earlier to honor another famous Austinite, Elisabet Ney, with a mission to promote the arts throughout the state. Its early work involved preserving Ney's studio and sculptures, eventually birthing the Elisabet Ney Museum in 1929. After Clara's donation, the TFAA oversaw the Laguna Gloria property until 1961, when the association split. From that, Laguna Gloria Art Museum was born, and it took on as its mission maintaining the villa's grounds, as well as providing education and exhibiting art.

From the Sixties through the Eighties, Laguna Gloria was a busy site for not only visual art, but also film screenings, dance and theatre performances, and music concerts, much of which took place under the oak trees in the amphitheatre by the villa. Most notably, the LGAM hosted the annual art fair, Fiesta. The spring event begun in 1950 (which continues today as Art City Austin) brought the city's residents out to Laguna Gloria in droves and was a major fundraiser for the museum. With over 8,000 volunteers helping to put it together, Fiesta captivated Austin and its arts scene through the Eighties and into the Nineties. In 1983, the Art School's 4,100-square-foot facility

was erected on Laguna Gloria's grounds and seemed to open up the potential for the villa's future. By that time, however, the museum had begun to pursue a dream of building a larger facility Downtown, and in 1996, in a step toward that goal, the institution relocated its primary exhibition space to 823 Congress and changed its name from Laguna Gloria Art Museum to the Austin Museum of Art (AMOA).

But AMOA was not alone in looking to claim a Downtown art space. In 1995, the TFAA purchased a

long-dormant retail store at 700 Congress with the intent of revamping it into a gallery space, or *kunsthalle*, dedicated specifically to contemporary work. In 1998, the TFAA opened the Jones Center for Contemporary Art, and four years later rebranded itself as Arthouse. Nine years passed with the two museums programming art within blocks of each other on the same street. Then in 2011, when Arthouse and AMOA celebrated their 100th and 50th anniversaries, respectively, the institutions announced their merger.

However, the union - or reunion, considering their status before the 1961 split - was marred with uncertainty that the two museums, which had separately experienced fiscal struggles and difficulty maintaining a donor base, would be stronger as one. It also raised questions about what kind of art the new institution would exhibit: established? experimental? local? international? It was decided that the main galleries would be in the Jones Center, but there was the lingering question of what to do with Laguna Gloria. While the Art School was still in operation, the villa remained undeniably sleepy, seeing more action as a rental venue for weddings than a vital gallery space.

It took the arrival of Louis Grachos for Laguna Gloria's potential to be revived.

A NEW ERA

Grachos took the museum's helm in early 2013, after a 10-year stint at the Albright-Knox Gallery in Buffalo, N.Y. His road to Austin was an adventurous one, full of travel and a rich education in the arts. Grachos grew up in Toronto, the eldest child of two Greek immigrants. His love of art history began at an early age, as did his appreciation for hockey; both topics will stop Grachos dead in his tracks even today. (Any mention of the Toronto Maple Leafs is a surefire way to have Grachos break into a smile and an anecdote about his hometown team.) He began his studies at the University of Toronto but moved to New York in 1979, finishing his art history degree at NYU. It was there that Grachos' interest in the arts began to bloom. He found himself immersed in the city's dynamic creative culture. Soon after, Grachos moved to San Francisco, taking a position as a research assistant at the San Francisco

Museum of Modern Art, only to return to New York in 1982 for a position at the Whitney.

Grachos' early career is marked by notable institutions: Queens Museum of Art, the Center for the Fine Arts in Miami, and San Diego's Museum of Contemporary Art. However, it was his appointment at SITE Santa Fe in 1996 - the same year that AMOA and Arthouse were emerging as key players in Austin's art scene - that truly cemented Grachos' status as a seminal force in the world of contemporary art. Grachos speaks fondly of his six years in Santa Fe, his eyes lighting up as he recalls collaborations with artists such as Pipilotti Rist and Jim Hodges out in the New Mexico desert. It is apparent that his stint at SITE Santa Fe was both exhilarating and extremely experimental, and helped push the limits of what Grachos deemed possible in contemporary art. His direction facilitated immersive installation CONTINUED ON P.36

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

LAGUNA GLORIA CONTINUED FROM **P.35** work and integrated, multifaceted programming, uplifting both SITE Santa Fe's reception and his professional reputation. His expansive vision earned him the directorship of the Albright-Knox Gallery in 2002.

All of that talent and drive, however, is only part of what makes Grachos so compelling. He commands a room not by force but by genial magnetism. At an event, Grachos can be seen busily attending to his duties as executive director, occasionally with a martini in hand, while still personally addressing each of his guests. Ever the host, Grachos devotes attention to his audience. making everyone from the young artist to the senior patron feel welcome. He's a family man with a son, James, who attends UT. Grachos adds proudly that his son plays hockey for the university, and he does his best to make it out to games. He enjoys traveling whenever possible and seeks out studio visits in tandem with gallery exhibitions. Grachos chooses his words wisely and pauses concertedly when his thoughts seem to get away from him, but is composed when faced with a subject that eludes him. His inquisitiveness is insatiable, yet his temperament is always demure. He is a man capable of great warmth and generosity who truly believes in celebrating artists and their craft, whether they be found in a New York gallery or on the ice rinks of Toronto.

Though Grachos himself calmly segued into his role as executive director of AMOA-Arthouse, his arrival marked a dramatic change for the institution. After years of what was perceived as curatorial stagnancy, the museum was suddenly pushing forward with a new creative identity and putting plans into motion. There was a rebrand, which abandoned both old names for something more current: the Contemporary Austin. New staff was brought in, including head curator Heather Pesanti, who accompanied Grachos from the Albright-Knox.

For some, this new era felt tainted with the same intense growth facing the entire city. Critics claimed the change read as another transplant from New York arriving in Austin to shape the city to his liking, which would mean bigger but perhaps not better. Grachos' first exhibitions (intricate affairs with members-only openings and exclusive dinners) did little to ease those anxieties. Austin's citywide cultural growth thus far had yielded little more than flashy high-rises, increased congestion, and a skyrocketing cost of living, and Grachos looked to be one more outsider ready to bulldoze all Charles Long, Orly Genger, and Marianne Vitale to tour the grounds with the idea of installing work there, and he found many of them excited by the prospect because of how unique to Austin the museum's lakefront location is. Though change was coming quickly to Laguna Gloria, Grachos made one thing very clear: "Under any plan [we might conceive], we want to maintain the texture and vision that Clara Driscoll provided for the grounds. It's very important to do that. Although the programming inside the building will probably shift and change, the integrity of the architecture and the surrounding formal gardens will be intact. But by including [art], we can truly activate those spaces." And as artists began

that the local community had long fought to preserve in pursuit of something more glamorous. The thing was, though, at its heart, AMOA had always sought a bit of glamour with Clara Driscoll's gift, even when that glamour was buried under safe programming and limited scope over the past five decades. The museum was long overdue for a revival, starting back at the source. It was time to return to Laguna Gloria with Grachos as Driscoll's de facto heir.

Grachos was unabashed about his first reaction to Laguna Gloria. Deeming it an eyesore in serious need of an update, he made revitalizing the grounds one of the first projects for his team. Indeed, it was such a priority for Grachos that he moved his entire executive office and staff out to the site. He was quick to invite artists like to work with the space, Laguna Gloria's overrun, dormant grounds became trim, neat, and outfitted with sculptures by some of contemporary art's most renowned names, such as Tom Sachs and Do Ho Suh.

In two short years, Laguna Gloria has been newly invigorated by the efforts of Grachos and his team. Liam Gillick's rainbow-hued *Raised Laguna Discussion Platform (Job* #1073) frames the villa's lagoon, once overgrown, and now neatly trim to frame the sculpture. Vitale's *Common Crossings*, steel sculptures made from train track junctions, now stoically anchor one of Laguna Gloria's clearings. John Grade's more recent inclusion of his *Canopy Tower* with its high Ipe wood paneling creates an elegant funnel amongst a grove's stately trees. Visitors can be seen strolling across the grounds, taking their time moving through the dynamic work. But it's not just the sculpture that is drawing new audiences. The Contemporary's education efforts include events like Second Saturdays and Teens Create! which seek to address and include the community's larger creative interests. The space has been transformed, and the progress has shown no signs of slowing down.

Grachos and the Contemporary's board have some grand proposals in the works, ones that would vastly expand the public's access to all of Laguna Gloria's grounds and make them more accommodating for visitors. Boston-based landscape architecture firm Reed Hilderbrand is developing a master plan for the 12-acre property. And Grachos has insisted on adding an artist residency on-site. Though small (Grachos believes only one or two artists would be able to occupy the buildings dedicated to the residency and studio space), it is a step that mirrors Driscoll's original ambitions of bringing an international creative community to Laguna Gloria and providing it a place to flourish. When asked what Grachos wants most to accomplish with the space, he smiles: "We want to advance the potential for Laguna Gloria."

However, it is the site's history that leaves the lasting impression. In a city that has grown so rapidly and has arguably stumbled in preserving its past, Laguna Gloria recalls a time in Austin when creativity was truly limitless. And as for Clara Driscoll, her legacy is shining ever brighter. Clara stands as a beacon for the profound good that can come from supporting a creative community and believing in the people that made her state so exceptional. That pride and community is what attracted people to Laguna Gloria from around the world – and it's time once again for that Texas spirit to harken creativity home.

Allies in the Industry

A month ago, 15 Austin actresses of various racial backgrounds sat down to read through a screenplay by Jonny Mars and Joshua Weber. After the table read, local casting director Vicky Boone stood up and personally thanked Mars and Weber for naming all the female characters and not writing physical descriptions of them into the script.

The room exploded with laughter. As the women around the table began to talk, however, the laughter gave way to other emotions, even tears. The actresses, some of whom I've interviewed for this series ("Tales From the Beauty Box," Feb. 20; "Tales From the Quirky Box," Feb. 27; "Tales From the Minority Box," March 6; "Tales From the Aging Box," March 13), were used to commiserating over nameless roles, insulting character breakdowns, and demeaning stereotypes behind closed doors. Many of them had decided that making their own films was the only path to change ("Crossing the [180-Degree] Line," March 20). Now, not only had they been invited to the table to read roles that weren't muses, love interests, nagging moms, prostitutes, maids, nannies, nurses, naked murder victims, or hot drunk girls, but they'd been asked for feedback on the script. The pent-up frustrations came pouring out.

Mars was electrified. Having been inspired by Wendy Davis' 2013 filibuster to make a narrative film about reproductive rights, Mars knew the subject of the script was emotional for many women, but he hadn't anticipated the impact of simply inviting them to read something with so many female roles. "I go in to read all the time, as an actor," he said. "As soon as [Boone] said that, I thought, oh my God, yeah. On the breakdowns, the women don't necessarily have names - it's usually an adjective plus a number and some kind of description of their physical traits."

Boone herself clarified for me why bit parts for women often seem more demeaning than analogous roles for men, even though both are written to advance the plot. She said that as a rule, bit parts for men tend to be described in the script by what they do - bellhop, say, or clerk – rather than by their looks. "That just distills how the characters move the plot

forward. The guy moves the plot forward by being a clerk - not by being hot."

Think of men's bit parts as verbs, not adjectives. Actors cast in "verb" roles might wind up being attractive or awkward, fat or thin, and their looks will have some discernible effect on the finished film. But their physical attributes are far less likely to be defined by the screenwriter, because their looks aren't their most important function for the plot. The same is true of nonwhite characters who are often written so that the defining aspect of the character is race – or rather, whatever approximate race is conveyed to a white audience by the actor's appearance.

Having worked as a casting director in Austin for 10 years, as well as directing two short films herself, Boone starts her casting process with talent, not character descriptions. Still, when you're looking at a script with five female roles named "Girl," as Boone said she has, the limits to that approach become clear.

When asked, many men say they just don't know how to write for women. I asked Mars how he overcame that challenge. He said that for him, research was key. That was the idea behind the table read, where women gave nuanced feedback on the script based on their own experiences, including the way pregnancy feels, perspectives from different cultural groups, and general advice to have the characters externalize their feelings in dialogue. "You just need to have the confidence to fail, and to accept the fact that you don't know it all," Mars said. "And you need to be open to this idea that people are going to inform you as to how other people think and feel." This approach not only made the female voices feel more authentic, but opened his eyes to the fact that, as he put it, "They were all fucking amazing actresses."

It's worth noting, however, that it's not the only way. Popular experiments in gender flipping show that female roles don't necessarily have to be pH-balanced for a woman. As Weber, who confessed to being so new to the industry that Mars had to explain Boone's comment to him, wrote in an email, "Writing a female role to me is what you do when the character you are writing is female."

To be clear, Mars and Weber aren't telling women's stories out of a sense of chivalry, or even pure altruism. From an artistic standpoint, they feel it is necessary. Mars said, "We need these fresh opinions, we need these fresh faces. I'm tired of watching movies about pudgy white dudes figuring out what they want to do." A small handful of mainstream writer/directors, like Judd Apatow and Paul Feig, have climbed on board – no

> doubt influenced, as well they should be, by the lure of a vast, nearly untapped market.

Not enough, however. Most actresses I spoke to for this series did not want to call men out on the record, due to the perfectly reasonable fear of alienating the people in the best positions to give them jobs. But I'm not an actress, and I've made my own observations, especially when it

comes to directors born and raised among Texas women. Richard Linklater, Wes Anderson, Robert Rodriguez: Check your scripts. What's the female-to-male ratio? How do the female characters move the plot forward? Is it by something they do, or by the way they look? Does the script specify their levels of hotness? Are all the female roles one-dimensional - or all but one? Do they require nudity? Are they stereotypes? Are they victims? Do they have their own hopes and dreams apart from the male protagonist? Or do they vanish when they leave the male protagonist's side? Y'all are better than that. Write a real, complex, multidimensional part for a real, complex, multidimensional woman. You say you wrote one? Great. Write another. Write them by the dozen. Make your Texas women proud.

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The Job of the Researcher: Cockroaches can be bold explorers or shy and withdrawn, according to recent work by researchers at Belgium's Université Libre de Bruxelles, who caught a bunch of them, affixed radio tags and studied their movements. The prosecutor is convinced that Vasquez-Hernandez saw his own son, Eloy, murder a woman in 2012, and the case is on hold until the victim's body is found. The judge has given Vasquez-Hernandez two opportunities to leave, both impractical (pay a \$500,000 bond or give a video deposition, but he speaks no English, is illiterate in Spanish and, said his lawyer, might be mentally incompetent). (Consolation: Material witnesses in Oregon earn \$7.50 a day.)

Least Competent Criminals

Not Ready for Prime Time: 1) Tyler Lankford, 21, attempting a robbery of Minerva's Bakery in McKeesport, Pa., in January, committed (according to police) the rookie mistake of laying his gun on the counter so he could pick up the money with both hands. The clerk grabbed the gun, and Lankford fled but was arrested in March. 2) There are expert counterfeiters, and then there is Cass Alder, 22, convicted by a court in Canada's Prince Edward Island of trying to pass \$100 bills that had been printed on napkins but affixed by Alder onto thicker paper.

Clueless in Florida's Panhandle: 1) Debra Mason, 58, was arrested for theft of a pickup truck in Destin, Fla., in January – and according to police, Mason said she knew it was stolen property but "didn't think it was 'that' stolen." 2) Ten miles away in Mary Esther, Fla., in February, Robert Pursley, 54, was arrested for DUI and was asked about items in his truck. According to the police report, Pursley insisted that everything was his – "except for anything illegal." A baggie of cocaine was in the truck's center console.

Laser Focus

Photographer Robert Shults has your "stimulated emission of radiation" right here, pal

In 2009, Austin-based photographer Robert Shults was introduced to the Texas Petawatt Laser facility. This is the laser lab, located in the bowels of the University of Texas, where elite scientists conduct experiments that create the brightest light known to exist in the entire universe. The Petawatt laser can produce, for a fraction of a second, more power than the entire U.S. electrical grid.

Shults was so impressed, he made the facility the subject of his next photodocumentary.

In 2015, here's an exhibition of those Shults photographs at Art.Science.

Gallery. in Big Medium's bustling Canopy compound on the Eastside. The show is called "The Superlative Light," which is also the name of the book that Shults has released, a fine volume that contains not only



those stark black-and-white images and a scientific essay by Dr. Todd Ditmire (the director of the Petawatt project), but an original science-fiction story, "Laser Shades," by no less a skiffy raconteur than Rudy Rucker. The exhibition of high-contrast,

arrestingly monochrome photography - what you might call technology-porn, some of it – spikes a graphic trail around the white gallery walls but leaves a large rectangle of open space for video projections. The book, elegantly designed by Ursula Damm and published by Daylight Books, was produced with a head-to-tail

binding like a much tonier version of one of those old Ace Doubles, and -Hold on a second. Why black-and-white?

Lasers are red, aren't they? Or at least they're some color, depending on what's aid-



ing the light amplification, right? Why in the world would a fellow ...?

"Someone asked that at the artist talk last Saturday," says Art.Science.Gallery.'s Hayley Gillespie. "Why didn't he shoot in color? Why did he use this really dark style? And Robert said he wanted to evoke what it felt like for an outsider to come into the facility, what it felt like to be there in awe of all this gigantic, hugely powerful equipment. And he's into old sci-fi B-movies and film noir, so you can see that in the photos too."

But it's not only old B-level sci-fi movies that Robert Shults is into. Which is why - remember the wall space reserved for video projec-

tions? - this Saturday, March 28, the photographer (and the above-mentioned Ditmire and research scientist Gilliss Dyer) will be in the gallery to present a screening of one of Shults' cinematic influences: Chris Marker's La Jetée. Note: Yes, that's the movie that also

inspired Terry Gilliam's 12 Monkeys. Addendum: No, neither Chris Marker

nor Terry Gilliam nor Bruce Willis nor Brad Pitt will be in attendance. But when you're documenting something that creates the brightest light known to exist in the entire universe, who needs any kind of Hollywood starpower at all?

Austin has been the epicenter of all things Tom Sachs since his "Boombox Retrospective" launched at the Contemporary Austin in January. Listeners can hear the NYC-based artist's playlists on the pirate radio station 94.3FM, view his work at the Jones Center and Laguna Gloria, and can now find a further extension of his work living in the Project Room at Lora Reynolds Gallery.

The exhibition, titled "Nuggets," showcases the pop-infused sculptures from Sachs' more recent work, with the earliest piece dating from 2011. However, many of these efforts ring of the cultural subversion that helped cement Sachs' standing as a contemporary arts force in the Nineties. In *Untitled ("I loved my sister's Barbie so very much. It's a crude rendition that tells a personal story of the artist's own relationship with the doll but also dismantles the emphasis on perfection and beauty that Barbie often encapsulates. Similarly, in *African American Express*, a black American Express card is fabricated into a prison shiv. It's another tongue-in-cheek sculpture that helps place classism and race – two subjects that Sachs frequently toys with – within the exhibit's scope.

While a fine exhibition, "Nuggets" must compete for attention with the other Sachs exhibitions in town – and, ultimately, it feels like a redundant annex of the artist's work already on display. – *Caitlin Greenwood*




The Aztex' Alfred Koroma Shams is on national team duty this month in Europe.

Sacred Sites & Nature Tours walk the ancient paths around the springs in **San Marcos**. It was from the waters of Spring Lake, the former Aquarena Springs, which the Miakan-Garza band of the Coahuiltecan people believed they were born.

When the Apache, Comanche, and Spanish arrived in South Texas they found hundreds of bands of people collectively called Coahuiltecans based on geography more than ethnicity. Seeking the protection of the mission walls, the groups of hunter-gatherers, who ranged south from Austin into northeastern Mexico, were assimilated into Hispanic society.

Despite nearly disappearing into the Texas culture, the group left behind a library of cave paintings. The White Shaman Panel on a rock wall near the Pecos River contains a map of four springs of special importance to the tribe, says Dr. Mario Garza, an elder of the Miakan-Garza band.

The tours, sponsored by the **Indigenous Cultures Institute**, begin at Spring Lake, where people followed the deer out of the belly of the Earth. With Dr. Garza's insightful stories, a walk through the wetlands, a ride on the glass-bottom boats, and a visit to Jacob's Well Park, it's a full day immersion into a Native American history seldom revealed.

Sacred Sites & Nature Tours meet at the Meadows Center in San Marcos and are a look into the past from a very unique perspective. Tours include a Native American meal, all entry fees, and transportation to Jacob's Well. For more info, call 512/393-3310 or go to www.indigenouscultures.org.

Austin Aztex Season Opener

It's on! The **Austin Aztex** inaugural pro season in **USL** has been a while coming, but it finally kicks off this Saturday at **House Park** (13th & Lamar), with our hometown boys taking on the **Colorado Springs Switchbacks**, a first-year expansion team, and one of four teams in USL that does not have an affiliation with an MLS squad. There's a lot riding on this game, of course: For a number of these players, it'll be their first professional game. For the Aztex organization, it's a chance to show the soccer world that Austin is indeed ready to take the plunge, and could be ready to support our first major league sports franchise.

Is Austin really ready to be a **major-league city**? The previous Aztex apparently didn't think so; they absconded to **Orlando**, and within four years, have moved up to **MLS** and have a new stadium in the works. Meanwhile, minor-league teams in Minneapolis, Sacramento, and San Antonio have been flexing their muscles with huge crowds and seemingly viable stadium plans, and are vying for the next MLS expansion announcement. Well, Saturday is Austin's turn: The Aztex have assembled a very strong squad, lured back their coach of choice, **Paul Dalglish**, from MLS, and are raring to go, with a core of the best players from last year's team, plus a truly impressive roster of young, but deeply experienced newcomers. They've done their part – now, if all those people who've asked me if Austin can really get an MLS franchise show up Saturday night, we'll have done ours.

The Aztex added one more big piece to their roster this week: Defender **Kalen Ryden**, who was drafted by Columbus Crew SC after earning allconference honors with the Aztex last year, has been assigned back here by the Crew as part of the clubs' affiliation agreement. Aztex officials say he's the only player coming down from the big club for now. It's great to see him back, but he'll be competing for playing time on a very deep and talented Aztex back line that should be a team strong point.

For me, personally, Saturday will be a first step toward a case of specially selected **Colorado microbrew beers**. The Aztex play the Switchbacks four times this season, and to commemorate the fledgling rivalry between these two new pro teams, I've set up a wager with the eminent **John Weiss**, publisher of the **Colorado Springs Independent**:

We can't do it at House Park of course (school district property), but somehow, somewhere, this is going to happen.

If the Aztex were to lose (no way), I might have to bend the rules a little, and include a sampler of Shiner brews, because the Aztex recently announced that **Shiner Beer** is on board as the team's Official Beer Sponsor, and provider for the **new and improved bier-garten** that the team is introducing for the 2015 season: inside the gates, but just outside the fence and off of school property. That's a big deal for the team – they set an attendance record during last year's playoffs, when they set up beer sales for perhaps the first time in House Park history – but it's just one of their initiatives to improve the gameday experience. There's also an expanded **kids area**, reserved seating, **VIP areas**, improved **food service**, and more.

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FOOD Salad Days Are Over

VEGAN FOOD'S NEXT STEP AT BISTRO VONISH

Bistro Vonish, one of Austin's newest vegan food trailers, has maybe had salad listed on the menu once since it opened in January. Once. Some omnivores may consider that perplexing, believing the misconception that salad is a vegan's sole source of nourishment. But that's a presumption that chef Craig Vanis has every intention of discrediting.

"Elevated" is how he describes his vegan cuisine, which is hardly a stretch when one scans over a chalkboard menu that lists dishes like butternut suppli, pear-arugula pizza with candied pecans and aged cashew cheese, and delightful choco-

late kolaches, offerings that will make even nonvegan foodies salivate. But besides offering mouth-

wateringly delicious fare, Vanis' goal is to offer food and an atmosphere that's kind to the planet – not to mention

the human body – that is not intimidating or pretentious, food that everyone can enjoy any day of the week.

"We want to see a different kind of vegan cuisine, or cuisine in general, present in this town and in our lives, so we're going to create it here," Vanis said with his ever-present smile.

It's a far cry from working in Texas oil fields. There, he was often teased by carnivorous coworkers, but it was also where he dis-

JIMMY KIMMEL'S GIFT to Austin keeps on giving. After a week of multiple restaurant meals, pie lunches, drinking games (Piñata!), and all-around culinary ambassadorship, Kimmel

wrapped up his self-styled "No Meal Wasted" tour of Austin last Friday night by being wheeled out of the Long Center on a gurney with EMTs in attendance. Kimmel made nightly references to his Austin dining habits, checking out barbecue joints and taco stands, hip new eateries, and old-guard favorites. He joked about bringing several sizes of suits to wear as the week progressed, and though he didn't weigh himself on camera, Kimmel did have his goofy sidekick **Guillermo Rodriguez**

get on the scales as soon as the crew arrived in Austin on March 13. Guillermo tipped the scales at 192.4 lbs that night, and Kimmel pledged to donate \$2,000 to local nonprofit **Urban Roots** for every pound Guillermo gained while they were in town. When Guillermo weighed in at 199.2 lbs during Friday night's final Austin monologue, Kimmel covered his passion for cooking. That love grew until he decided to make the transition from the oil industry's grit and grime to the fire and energy of the kitchen when he lost his job in 2009.

He started by making tamales at a farmers' market and in no time was head chef for several vegetarian restaurants in Austin, including Mother's Cafe and Veggytopia, all while studying at plant-based culinary school the Natural Epicurean. But there soon came a time when Vanis wanted

something that was all his. He started with supper clubs, offering curious diners a fixed menu, and in January took

menu, and in January took the plunge and opened his food trailer.

"It's been fantastic," Vanis said, still smiling. "I get to

play with and create something in the place that makes me happiest, and I get to do that every day, and it's awesome."

He uses only fresh, local, in-season produce and creates dishes that are classic and comforting, and new and fresh. He brings familiar comfort food like pizza and macand-cheese kolaches to the vegan masses but also celebrates vegetables in seasonal menus.

"We want this to be a venue to show the world that vegans don't just eat salad, that vegetables and plant food is amazing and colorful and fun and just as soulful and emotional and sophisticated and artistic; there's nothing to give up if you're going vegan," Vanis said.

That soon will include a fine-dining experience. Vanis plans to bring his inspired cuisine to a brick-and-mortar location. The goal is to open this year and offer lunch, dinner, and happy hour. In the meantime, Bistro Vonish offers a killer brunch on Sundays, still holds a supper club, and serves lunch and dinner six days a week. His former oil colleagues may have teased him, but Vanis is getting the last laugh. – Alisha McDarris

Hopping on the rabbit bandwagon

Rabbits aren't just for snuggling. They are, in fact, for eating. Though rabbit meat's last heyday (at least in the United States) was during World War II when most of the beef was shipped to troops overseas, the consumption of rabbit meat is again on the rise. While some might find the notion of eating something so cute quite difficult to stomach (Whole Foods' decision to start selling the white meat at select stores in 2014 was met with boycotts and protested by groups such as the House Rabbit Society), the meat has historically been embraced by different cultures and countries throughout the world, as it's accessible, sustainable, and delicious. In Austin, chefs, diners, and home cooks are increasingly clamoring for the mild and sweet taste of the versatile meat.

According to Dai Due chef/owner Jesse Griffiths, the restaurant is going through 20-30 rabbits a week, a particularly high volume. Because Dai Due generally serves it as a whole half-rabbit, that represents close to 40-60 servings. "I'm a huge fan of rabbit, because I like the animal, and it's very low impact. It's a very efficient protein, and I think if you legitimize it and normalize it through your menus then you're going to start to see people raise them more, and I think that's part of breaking down our food system to make more sense," says Griffiths.

Dai Due experiments with a variety of rabbit dishes including rabbit tacos, stew, confit rabbit, green curry with fresh herbs and rabbit, as well as a traditional French-style preparation using muscat, fennel, and cream. According to Griffiths, the resurgence in rabbit is likely a result of more adventurous eaters. "People in the context of this restaurant come in and eat things like rabbit livers as an entrée and we sell out of blood sausage and chicken feet. These things aren't ordered for irony anymore. ... They're ordered because that's what people want to eat for dinner," he says. "If you're going to eat meat, you should eat meat."

While Dai Due doesn't procure their rabbit from HausBar Farms (it is not currently allowed under the urban farm ordinance), Griffiths says the urban farm's practices are the best he's ever seen in terms of raising animals, and in this case, rabbits. Dorsey Barger of HausBar Farms started raising rabbits because her license from the Department of State Health Services to raise and slaughter chickens included a rabbit exemption. "That's when I discovered how amazing, sustainable, and wonderful they are, and I fell in love," she says.

Ideally suited to an urban area, rabbits do not take up much space, don't smell, and they're quiet. The fact that they breed prolifically makes them a particularly sustainable source of urban protein. According to Barger, she and her wife Susan Hausmann raise their own protein because they are horrified with the way protein is raised in terms of cruelty to animals in this country and around the world. "We decided to divorce ourselves from the system. We want the animals to have a life and enjoy living, so we created an entire system that would allow all the animals to feel safe and secure and have lots of room to run around and play," she says.

Barger's method includes approximately 1500 square feet of living space for the rabbits, reinforced with chicken wire so the rabbits can't dig out, and fishing line strung zig-zag across the top of the open running space. Privacy during birthing is important to rabbits, so Barger created a system of "birthing centers" where the mothers can go to give birth and wean for four weeks until the offspring are off to "teenage housing" for another four weeks. When they're big enough, the rabbits are let loose in the bunny corral. Once the rabbits are full-size, HausBar processes the animals for their consumption utilizing every part of the rabbit. "We eat every thing, including the lungs, brain, and the eyeballs. We eat every part except for their intestines. That's super sustainable because nothing is wasted. It's so unbelievably delicious."

Barger and Griffiths aren't the only ones intrigued by the meat. According to Swift's Attic sous chef Zack Northcutt, the restaurant has already served rabbit five times in the first three months of the year, selling out each time. According to Northcutt, if the restaurant had more access to the meat in terms of a good, local source, it would be probably be on the menu more. Northcutt prefers to confit or braise the meat, adding that it pairs nicely with citrus and is great for pasta and cream sauce, as well as tomato sauce. Sometimes Northcutt makes bacon from the belly. "It's really versatile in terms of what you can do with it, and it's such a light and refreshing protein. Plus, they're adorable and delicious," he says.



Sam Hellman-Mass, executive chef and part owner of Odd Duck, also prefers to make a confit by cooking the rabbit in chicken fat. In the past he's also prepared a rabbit terrine using sausage, cream, eggs, and ground rabbit meat. According to Hellman-Mass, eating rabbit can challenge expectations of what food is. "Rabbit looks like something you're more familiar with than other animals, and the association can be difficult to get around. The appearance of a dead animal for someone who's not used to seeing that is more striking than a cellophane-wrapped something you'd see in a grocery store, but if you can get past that, one is clearly a lot better than the other."

ZACK NORTHCUTT'S RABBIT RILLETTE

2 whole rabbits Stock to cover 1 cup melted butter Spice mix, toasted and ground: 1 teaspoon green peppercorn 1 teaspoon Tellicherry peppercorn 4 teaspoons salt

Season rabbit with spice mix and sear both sides in a roasting pan on low heat until golden brown. Cover the rabbits with stock while in the pan, then cover the pan. Put the pan in the oven at 325°, and braise for at least six hours until completely tender. Let chill to room temperature in the braising liquid. Pull rabbit from the roasting tray, and strain the stock. Separate meat from the bone, placing the rabbit meat into a mixing bowl. Whip the meat in a food processor with a paddle at medium speed. Add back around a cup of the braising liquid into the mixer to help process the meat. Slowly incorporate half of the melted butter into the bowl until the mixture is smooth. Transfer the mixture into small ramekins or another type of jar, and pack well. Pour a bit of the melted butter over the top of the mixture and let chill for at least an hour before serving.

LOLA BAZAN GALINDO'S CONEJO EN CHILE GUAJILLO

Lola Bazan Galindo has worked for HausBar for the last six and a half years. She knows how to slaughter and butcher any type of animal and how to use every bit of edible material from any of those animals: lungs, gizzards, eyeballs, brains, kidneys, livers, intestines, stomachs, feet, and blood. Passed down through Lola's family's oral tradition, this is the first time the recipe has been written down.

- 1 whole ³/₄-pound rabbit
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 small onion
- 9 cloves of garlic, peeled
- 1/4 pound dried guajillo chiles
- 8 black peppercorns
- 8 cloves
- 10 comino seeds
- 2 tablespoons favorite cooking oil
- 1 small bunch chopped fresh cilantro

Place the rabbit in a large stock pot and fill with enough cold water to cover the rabbit. Add salt, one half of the onion, and five cloves of garlic. (No need to chop the onion or garlic.) Bring to a boil, reduce heat to medium, and cook at a simmer for an hour and a half to two hours until the meat is falling off the bone. Drain the liquid and remove the onion and garlic (you can throw them into the compost at this point) and pick all of the meat off of the bones, shredding into bite-sized pieces. Set aside.

In a large sauté pan, toast guajillo chiles over low heat, stirring continuously so that the chiles won't burn, for about two minutes, until they become wonderfully fragrant. Remove from pan and set aside in a heat-proof bowl large enough to hold all of the peppers.

Into the large sauté pan over low heat, add four cloves of garlic and sauté stirring continuously for five minutes so that the garlic browns and becomes fragrant but does not burn. Remove and place in a blender. Pour boiling water over guajillos to soften them. Let stand for two minutes. Remove chiles from

soaking liquid and place in the blender. Reserve liquid.

Into the large sauté pan, add peppercorns, cloves, and comino seeds and stir constantly for five minutes so that spices become fragrant and toasted but not burned. Place toasted spices in the blender and add just enough of the chile soaking water to almost cover the contents of the blender. Purée all ingredients.

Add two tablespoons of oil to the large sauté pan and heat over medium-low heat. Pour puréed mixture through a sieve or strainer into the sauté pan pressing the solids with a wooden spoon to get all of the liquid out (be careful of oil splatters which are pretty much inevitable) and to remove whatever solids weren't puréed by the blender. Discard solids and stir puréed mixture into oil. Stir shredded rabbit meat to mixture and salt to taste. Remove when meat is heated through. Serve on fresh homemade corn tortillas sprinkled with the cilantro and the remaining half onion, finely chopped.

Spring is here, and while that might conjure up thoughts of rebirth and renewal, the folks at the Austin Film Society have been preoccupied with crime and punishment. Their latest series, Perfect Criminals: The '70s French Noir Connection, revisits the glory days of Eurocrime dramas. In conjunction with Drafthouse Films, which is releasing The Connection the other side of William Friedkin's The

French Connection – AFS picked some seminal classics, as well as some hidden gems.

Series opener, The Sicilian Clan, features a trifecta of French movie stars: Alain Delon, Jean Gabin, and Italian-born Lino Ventura. Delon plays Roger Sartet, a cutthroat thief who escapes custody with the help of Gabin's character's mob family. They devise a plan to steal a fortune in jewels, but the enterprise is complicated by Le Goff

(Ventura), a police captain obsessed with recapturing Sartet, doggedly circling his every move (while also trying to quit smoking). Henri Verneuil's adaptation of Auguste Le Breton's novel features stylish direction and a great score by Ennio Morricone. The scene in which Sartet beats a large eel to death by slamming it repeatedly against some rocks must be seen to be believed.

No French noir series would be complete without the great Jean-Pierre Melville, and AFS has programmed two of his finest films, Le Samourai and Le Cercle Rouge. In the

existentialist masterpiece, Le Samourai, Delon plays a hitman who strictly follows the Bushido code. Seen by eyewitnesses after completing a contract, Delon's Jef Costello is picked up by police in a roundup, but is eventually released due to his airtight alibi. When his employers decide that killing him would be a lot easier than paying him, Costello goes after them. Melville's intoxicating cine-

matic style coupled with Delon's mercurial portray-**THE '70S FRENCH NOIR** al of a dead man walking make Le Samourai the distilled epitome of cool. Melville returned to urban crime, and created his magnum opus with 1970's Le Cercle Rouge. Ostensibly a heist film, Melville follows three strangers - jewel thief Corey (Delon), escaped con Vogel (Gian Maria Volonté), and alcoholic excop Jansen (Yves Montand) – as they plan to rob a highly guarded

jewelry store. Famous for its nearly silent heist sequence that lasts almost half an hour, Le Cercle Rouge is also a culmination of Melville's obsession with masculinity, loyalty, and the lives of marginalized outsiders.

Next up is Claude Sautet's elegant and rarely seen crime film, Max and the Junkmen. Michel Piccoli plays the titular Max, an independently wealthy police officer who, after being thwarted by bank robbers one too many times, concocts a plan to

catch them in the act. After running into an old army pal, Abel (Bernard Fresson), who now works as a scrap collector, Max tries to lure Abel and his "junkmen" into committing a bank job so he can catch them in the act. The plan hinges on Lily (Romy Schneider), Abel's girlfriend and a prostitute, whom Max, pretending to be a lonely banker, hires to feed the gang information. Can you say entrapment? Sautet skillfully undermines our expectations throughout the film, and by the last scene, you realize you were watching something else entirely. A beautiful film with understated performances, Max and the Junkmen is French noir at its finest.

Rounding out the series is The Burglars, with Jean-Paul Belmondo and his group of thieves heisting emeralds from a Greek industrialist's Athens mansion by using one of the most inscrutable safe-cracking devices in the history of cinema. But when their escape plans are delayed, they have to lie low for a few days. Enter Omar Sharif as a corrupt cop who would very much like those emeralds for himself. Featuring an amazing car chase around Athens and great stunt work from Belmondo, this one has it all, including an entertaining treatise on Greek food by Sharif, an extended cameo by Dyan Cannon, and a hilarious excursion to one seriously schizophrenic erotic nightclub.

So, make sure that raincoat is cinched up tight, and your fedora is on straight. Stock up on Gauloises and check the oil on your Citroën (don't forget to check the trunk), because you can never be sure how close les flics are to barging in and spoiling the whole plan. Chances are, they're right behind you.

So, I screwed up. A girl I was dating sent me a photo text of herself topless. I drunkenly forwarded it to a couple of buddies. One of them, without telling me, put it up on Reddit. Now I have no idea how widely it's been circulated. How do I put this genie back in the bottle and get the photo taken down before it somehow gets back to my ex and embarrasses us both?

This isn't just a mistake, UHOH, it's a gross violation of your ex's privacy, and in many states it's a crime. Though Texas has not yet passed a law outlawing "revenge porn" and unauthorized nudes, we already have precedent for hefty damages in civil court. Last year, a Houston woman sued an ex-boyfriend over private photos that he had posted online. She was awarded \$500,000. In your case, it's not clear how the liability would be shared between you and your buddy, but, make no mistake, you both owe your ex much more than an apology. (And if your ex was under 18 when the pictures were taken, you will be amazed at the severity of the penalties you could face.)

That said, we agree that the best thing you can do now is work to get the photo taken down. If your friend hasn't removed it from Reddit or Imgur already, that's the obvious place to start. Hopefully anyone who has reblogged it has used links to the original location rather than copy/pasting or downloading and re-uploading it. If that has happened, the photo will be difficult to trace. You can try a "reverse image search" - companies like TinEye and Image Raider offer services where, if you upload a photo, they will identify other places on the Internet where the photo has been shared. It's a Catch-22, however. To find other instances of the photo, you'd have to upload the photo again, essentially recommitting the infraction that got you here in the first place.

We aren't lawyers - don't take legal advice from us. We do, however, suggest getting in touch with a professional. If you have access to a good lawyer, consult him or her about your options moving forward. Choose counsel that is well-versed in the Digital Millennium Copyright Act, which lays out rules for image ownership and "takedown notices." You might also seek out a good reputation management agency (but beware of scammers - it's not a well-regulated industry). If professional assistance seems expensive, consider what you could owe in a lawsuit.

Finally, you should tell your ex. As the owner of the selfie, she has additional power under the law to help, as you say, "put the genie back in the bottle" before it's too late and the image has proliferated widely. She will be rightfully angry, but she may be less litigious if she finds out about your "mistake" through a heartfelt apology from you. It's time to give her back the keys to her own privacy - you've borrowed them for too long. :) HD

Snowdrift Odyssey

When the legend becomes film ...

Like a story once heard but not committed to memory, *Kumiko, the Treasure Hunter* unfolds in wispy fragments and memorable images. The original film by the Austin-based Zellner brothers (co-screenwriters, with David directing and Nathan producing) is rare object, unlike your everyday movie. It's an enchanting work, heartbreaking yet wryly amusing, about Kumiko (Kikuchi), a misguided and possibly deranged Japanese woman who absconds with her boss' credit card and buys a plane ticket to the U.S. in order to get to Fargo, N.D., to uncover the bag of loot buried in the snow in the Coen brothers' movie *Fargo*.

Kumiko's quest is folly to you and me, but her naive mind thinks there's no difference between the movie and reality, and she sees herself as a conquistador sailing off to the Americas. Speaking no English (except for a place she enunciates as "Faah-go" while pointing to a spot on her treasure map when strangers stop to inquire after her well-being), and without money (the credit card is canceled once the airfare charge shows up back in Tokyo), Kumiko wraps herself in a blanket

and soldiers forward through the snow. Kind but ineffectual strangers attempt to assist her along the way (most notably, David Zellner's sympathetic policeman, who takes her to a Chinese restaurant hoping to find a Japanese translator). Prior to her departure from Tokyo, scenes of Kumiko at her job and on the phone with her hectoring mother give signs that she is mentally unbalanced, but never more so than while watching her figure out what to do with her pet rabbit Bunzo.

The Zellners' story was inspired by an urban legend concerning the baffling facts about a real Japanese woman who froze to death in the North Dakota snow, but what the Zellners cling to most are the story's inexplicable aspects. The film encourages you to view the movie through her experience, but like any good treasure hunt, we're only provided clues and forced to make any deductions on our own. Kikuchi is magnificent and conveys a wealth of emotions through her facial expressions. The snowy compositions of cinematographer Sean Porter burrow under vour skin, and the ethereal soundtrack by the Octopus Project is so effective that it was singled out for a Special Jury Prize at Sundance. In their best work yet, the Zellner brothers have pieced together a truly mystifying human puzzle.



THE DIVERGENT SERIES: INSURGENT D: Robert Schwentke; with Shailene Woodley, Theo James, Kate

A more efficient indifference generator than last spring's *Divergent*, dutiful follow-up *Insurgent* spares us a reel's worth of training montages as young heroine Tris (Woodley) remains on the run from the oppressive likes of Jeanine (Winslet), militant ruler of a near-future Chicago where most denizens have been split into five approved factions: Abnegation, Amity, Candor, Dauntless, and Erudite.

Tris and boyfriend Four (James) continue to be hunted down for being Divergent, a veritable assortment pack of human characteristics unwelcome in this particular dystopia, cast out much as the Factionless have been. Sound complicated? It's really not. So long as you know that Tris is the Special One (and few hesitate to remind her, and us, of the fact), you'll be able to keep up with her drawn-out quest to liberate all Chicagoans from their societal shackles.

The second in a series of four films derived from Veronica Roth's three novels (ah, Hollywood math), *Insurgent* exists primarily to either validate or defy the imagined depiction of events in the heads of countless teen fans. Taken on its own terms, there's little here that genuinely excites. Director Robert Schwentke (*Flightplan*, *RED*) has made his name by being a perfectly proficient visual stylist, and he finds some nice framing to the characters and action every now and then, which is more than could be said of the exceedingly drab *Divergent*.

However, the sequel's chief rationale for amped-up action – a series of simulations endured by Tris at the hands of Jeanine in order to unlock a mysterious doohickey – are immediately undercut by a lack of stakes. The scenarios deliver plenty of eye-catching imagery and 3D-enhancing debris, but they also make for no small amount of false peril and a whole lot of literally interpreted trauma. Saddled with PTSD and *Felicity*

The Zellners' Beautiful Dreamer

Kumiko, the Treasure Hunter mines urban legend

David and Nathan Zellner's haunting new film *Kumiko*, the Treasure Hunter, is the Austin-based siblings' most ambitious and technically accomplished movie yet. (Among their previous features are *Kid-Thing* and *Goliath*.) Featuring a remarkably internalized performance from Oscar-nominated Rinko Kikuchi (*Babel*) in the title role, the Sundance and fan favorite finally opens in Austin on Friday. Prepare to be unnerved, astounded, and emotionally transported into a world that, while subversively similar to our own, plays out like someone else's half-recalled fever dream ... that is, if cinematographer Sean Porter and soundtrack scorers the Octopus Project were standard-issue collaborators within our collective, dormant subconscious.

It begins with a tracking-battered VHS title card: "This is a true story." Well, sort of: Kumiko is loosely based on the factual, if still murkily mysterious story of Takako Konishi, a Tokyo office worker who was found dead, inexplicably, outside of Detroit Lakes, Minn., in November 2001. That's 9,240 kilometers and, apparently, the perfect distance traveled to fuel the Internet's Department of Wild Speculation. Prior to her lonely demise, Konishi had been found wandering by the Bismarck, N.D., police and, in a tangled mishmash of cross-cultural, linguistic misunderstandings, rumors surfaced that she had sojourned all that way to search for the buried suitcase of blood money buried by Steve Buscemi's character in the Coen brothers' entirely fictional 1996 film Fargo. That film also began with the "This is a true story" tag. Despite its emotionally freighted tone. Kumiko is not without the Zellner brothers' trademark moments of absurdist levity.

"[The bizarre story of Takako Konishi's death] kind of grew bigger and bigger online," explains Nathan Zellner. "This is before Facebook and Twitter, so it didn't spread as instantly as it would have now. But there was information about a Japanese woman going from Tokyo to Minnesota looking for the fortune from the movie *Fargo*. I think it was the limited amount of information that drew us in. And also, like a lot of people, we *wanted* to believe it, you know? But it was the legend that drew us to the story in the first place, and that's what we wanted to be true to."

Kumiko, the Treasure Hunter begins when lonely, bored "office lady" Kumiko discovers a moldering VHS copy of the Coen brothers' film *Fargo* and comes to believe that

what she's seeing is not a fictional Hollywood film, but instead some sort of documentary. Off she travels to the frigid climes of the upper Midwest to seek out *Fargo*'s frostbitten suitcase of cash, armed only with a crudely stitched map and exactly the wrong sort of wardrobe. Persistence, however, Kumiko has in spades.

Watching the Zellner brothers' fictional take on a story that already seemed surreal to begin with is a heady, dreamy experience. Shot on location on the staid side streets of Tokyo and the bleak whiteouts of Minnesota, *Kumiko, the Treasure Hunter* is the Zellners' profound reimagining of the classic quest tale. At least there are sneaky, unexpected slivers of hope riddled throughout the film; *Kumiko* is an ode to contemporary outsiders of all stripes.

Nearly a decade passed since the brothers first conceived the idea and actually filmed it – enough time for Kikuchi to become passably fluent in English (although our interview was conducted with the help of a translator who, in a Zellner-esque twist, sounded exactly like Kikuchi herself).

"About eight years ago they sent me the script," recalls Kikuchi, speaking on the phone from New York with her translator at the ready. "I read it and I was falling

in love with the character, so I met [the Zellners] in L.A. They were so unique to me that I decided that I was going to make this movie. I decided that almost eight years ago."

In the meantime, Kikuchi was nominated for an Oscar for her supporting role in Alejandro González Iñárritu's badvibe triptych of 2006, *Babel*. In 2011, she won the hearts and minds of Fantastic Festers with director Katsuhito Ishii's *Funky Forest*. While the Zellners – along with producers Chris Ohlson, Alexander Payne, and Georgina Pope – were busy working up the funding for *Kumiko* and tackling the ridiculously complex logistics of a multinational shoot, Kikuchi broke big in both Hollywood and arthouse circles.

"They were always coming up with interesting ideas," says Kikuchi. "I was, like, 'Are you guys capable of thinking about anything other than the movie you're making?" The

time that I spent making that movie was a very special time for me. It was a film unlike anything I had ever done or had ever been asked to do."

"We met her in 2008," says Nathan Zellner over a bubbling bowl of étouffée at Ruby's BBQ, "and then there were another four years until we were able to go start filming and so, yeah, in the meantime she really did learn English."

"When we saw *Babel*," adds brother David, who also has a substantial role in the finished film, "we knew she'd be a good candidate based on that. And then we met with her and she got the tone of what we were going for right away. It's a very delicate tone for the film – that balance of the humor and the pathos or melancholy – and she totally dialed into that right away."

Most low-budget indie films would evaporate after eight years of pre-production, but the Zellners kept busy shooting and releasing other features and shorts, and occasionally turning up in friends' projects.

"Kumiko took forever for myriad different reasons." explains Nathan. "Because it was weather-dependent, we had to work around Rinko's schedule, and financing was tough. But we still wanted to make it as real and authentic as possible. We just broke it down by figuring out what the cost would be to shoot [the half of the film that was set in Japan], and what was the minimum amount of people we would have to take over. It was the two of us, [producer] Chris Ohlson, and Director of Photography Sean Porter."

Filming finally commenced in Tokyo in the fall of 2012, after which the production had a 48-hour turnaround before heading back to the States to begin pre-production in Minnesota.

As for the complexities of figuring out how they were going to find a crew, gear, and begin shooting, David explains, "There was a lot of Internet searching. There wasn't a lot of stuff in English, so I was looking online at films that we liked that were shot there and then seeing what companies were involved. We're fans of the movie *Enter the Void*, so we looked up that production company, contacted them, and they turned out to be the best match for us."

Scouting locations turned out to be more problematic: "There were a couple of leads that just didn't pan out," says David. "There weren't as many bilingual resources as one would think. The reason the project took so long was because some of it was shaky financing, some of it was hav-

ing to work around everyone's schedule, and then having two different crew bases line up. It was like we shot two features back-to-back, basically."

The Zellners' finished film is a sublime masterpiece with subtextual commentary on quiet, dreamy outsiders trapped inside a modern, global media-frenzied milieu. The end result may be intentionally enigmatic, but Kumiko's through-the-lookingglass plight riffs on an increas-

ingly common theme in a decidedly uncommon fashion. And you can't help but wonder, as the film progresses from Tokyo to Fargo, if Joel and Ethan Coen have seen it, and if so, what did they think? (The Zellners say they are unsure either way.)

"We've had such a great reaction to [*Kumiko*]," says David Zellner. "It's not like offers are flooding in, and that's fine. I mean, we're pretty particular about what we want to do. And thankfully we have enough ideas of our own to where we're not relying at all on [the commercial] success of *Kumiko*. It would be fun to adapt something if it was the right project, but if not, we'll just keep making our own stuff and stick to that baseline."

GET HARD

D: Etan Cohen: with Will Ferrell, Kevin Hart, Alison Brie, Craig T. Nelson, Edwina Findley Dickerson, Ariana Neal, T.I.. (R, 100 min.)

When Wall Street tycoon James King (Ferrell) is arrested for embezzlement at his engagement party to cash-mad Alissa (Brie), he recruits Darnell (Hart) - his previously unnoticed car washer - to train him to withstand the rigors of life in the big house. King, being a rich white guy, has erred in his assumption that Darnell, being a person of color, is intimately familiar with prison life. Topical, interracial, fish-out-of-water laughs ensue. Well, not really, unless you find homophobic, racist, and just plain idiotic gags a hoot. Beyond a leper's handful of jokes that actually connect, this might as well be Ferrell's most abysmal piece of work since the disastrous Land of the Lost.

Ferrell long ago proved that he's a terrifically talented actor and comic when working with equally fine material. The Anchorman films, Elf, and the truly inspired Stranger Than Fiction are all prime examples of serious skills, be they comic or otherwise. With Get Hard, however, Ferrell has traded in his "funny or die" mantra for something more like "silly or die" or maybe "puerile or cry." (His character, a spineless, generic Wall Street caricature, really does gush buckets from time to time.)

It's a bizarre misfire, made even stranger by the talent behind the project, chief among them Kev & Peele staff writers Jav Martel and Ian Roberts, who could have injected some seriously subversive comedy vis-à-vis our current, increasingly heated national conversations on race and income inequality. Instead, the whole film is a nonstop parade of dick jokes, rape jokes, and Will Ferrell making the same goofy faces he first introduced on SNL ages ago. This is uninspired stuff at best. Do not pass go, do not collect \$200, go directly to comedy jail. 1

HOME

D: Tim Johnson: with the voices of Jim Parsons, Rihanna, Steve Martin, Jennifer Lopez, Matt Jones, (PG, 94 min.)

You won't need any ruby slippers to find your way home from this new animated film from DreamWorks. Your everyday kicks will get you there just fine because Home follows a well-worn path that needs no magic or road markers to reach the finish line. If overly familiar and uninspired, Home is nevertheless agreeable, especially for young viewers who haven't been down this road countless times.

The characters in Home learn that individuality isn't necessarily a bad thing (a bit of advice the filmmakers might have taken to heart), and that friendship can overcome the differences between people (or people and aliens). The Boov are a race of timid aliens who flee to another planet every time their well-being is threatened. Their supremely goofy leader Captain Smek (voiced by Martin) has decided that the Boov will next occupy Earth in an effort to sidestep their longtime enemies, the Gorg. Oh (Parsons) is a misfit whose friendliness and sociability run counter to Boov customs, and is therefore ostracized. Tip (Rihanna) is a young girl who, along with her cat named Pig, has escaped benign exportation to Australia, along with all the other indigenous humans, while she waits for her mother (Lopez) to return. But then she's forced to escape from her hideout and reluctantly teams up with Oh, despite his peculiarities, because he can transform an automobile into a souped-up spaceship.

As the voice of Oh, Parsons doesn't stray far from the persona of Sheldon Cooper, the character he plays on The Big Bang Theory. Oh is a narrow-minded know-it-all, whose English grammar constructions are closer to Jar Jar Binks than Yoda. He's baffled by the concept of pets and is aghast when his body starts twitching rhythmically in response to music. Of course, Rihanna's Tip has more than a few tunes to offer. In addition to the pleasant surprise of seeing a woman of color playing a leading role in an animated film (two, if you count J-Lo's secondary part), it turns out that Rihanna is quite winning as the young girl, finally finding a film role that suits her.

Although it may not be where the heart is, Home is a functional escape and shelter.

IT FOLLOWS D: David Robert Mitchell; with Maika Monroe, Lili Sepe, Jake Weary, Kier Gilchrist, Daniel Zovatto, Olivia Luccardi. (R, 100 min.)

Something is coming for us. It is inevitable, be it disease, disaster, or disillusionment (believe me, that can be a killer). It Follows sets up a narrative in which an unstoppable force, in this case an entity that can take any human form, inexorably tracks its victims through sexual intercourse. Once this entity gets you, you're through, as is potentially everyone back through the chain of liaisons. Your only recourse is to pass the curse to someone else, and hope they do the same. It's a clever hook on an old saw, one that writer/ director David Robert Mitchell (The Myth of the American Sleepover) subverts further by making survival dependent on having more sex, instead of being punished for having it at all.

After a prologue in which we see the gruesome effects of this curse, we meet Jay (Monroe), your average teenage girl living in the suburbs of Detroit. She and her sister Kelly (Sepe), and their small group of friends are whiling away the summer watching old monster movies and playing card games. Jay has a date, though, with new boyfriend Hugh (Weary) that ends first in the backseat of a

car, and then with Jay duct-taped to a wheelchair in a dilapidated parking garage while Hugh frantically explains that he just gave her the worst STD imaginable. She returns home freaked out, and soon enough is benignly stalked (it is called It Follows, not It Chases). Convincing her sister and friends that she is in mortal danger, they try to help her track down the source and stop the monster.

Mitchell mixes the mood of early David Cronenberg with the brilliant mise-en-scène that John Carpenter utilized so well in his late-Seventies output. It Follows has style to burn, and the cinematography, coupled with a nuanced, synth-heavy soundtrack keeps ratcheting up the tension in smart and creative ways. It may wear its influences on its sleeve, but It Follows eclipses mere cinematic pastiche to create something creepy and evocative. It is filled with unsettling imagery and a paranoiac atmosphere, and has a wicked slant on the horror genre's obsession with burgeoning sexuality. You're not likely to shake it anytime soon.

SEYMOUR: AN INTRODUCTION D: Ethan Hawke, (PG, 81 min.)

As he explains in Seymour: An Introduction, Ethan Hawke had the great fortune to be seated next to Seymour Bernstein at a dinner party. Best known as an Oscar- and Tony-nominated actor, Hawke is a modern multi-hyphenate who has also authored a couple of books and co-authored screenplays (with Richard Linklater and Julie Delpy), and directed several movies and plays. Lately, however, Hawke tells us that he was strug-



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gling with "why I do what I do." Not only did Hawke discover the wisdom and insight of Bernstein to be helpful with his own artistic quandaries. Hawke found in Bernstein the subject of his next documentary. Earlier in his life. Bernstein had been a brilliant and highly praised concert pianist, but had given up performing at the age of 50 due to stage fright and his dislike of artistic commercialism, and took up teaching full-time - the better to spread his ideas about music and life. The two artists took a shine to each other, and voilà: A documentary was born.

Hawke chose well his subject; Bernstein is indeed an intriguing master and paragon of authenticity. (Perhaps it's at this level that the film's title has any connection beyond the obvious with its original source, a J.D. Salinger story, phoniness being a frequent concern of Salinger's characters.) Footage shows Bernstein one-on-one with his students and in master classes, and talking with former students, among them Michael Kimmelman, the architecture critic for The New York Times. We get some glimpses into the arts world in the latter half of the last century. All the while, with little intercession by Hawke, Bernstein delivers philosophical gems about how music and life will interact in never-ending cycles of fulfillment. However, more direct involvement by Hawke would have been welcome. So many follow-up questions are left unasked. The film is at its liveliest when the filmmaker and his subject discuss the twofold presence of human monstrosity and artistic gifts or the human propensity to value talent over craft. It's lovely that with Hawke here shares this guru of sorts with the world, but if we really want to know what makes Bernstein's inner metronome tick, that's not to be found in this movie.

WILD TALES

D: Damián Szifrón; with Érica Rivas, Ricardo Darín, Oscar Martínez, Leonardo Sbaraglia, Diego Gentile, Walter Donado, Osmar Núñez, Germán de Silva, Julieta Zylberberg, Rita Cortese, María Marull. (R, 122 min., subtitled)

Snap! That's the crack of people teetering on the verge in each of the six segments in the perversely entertaining Argentinian film Wild Tales, a more-than-deserving recent Oscar nominee for Best Foreign Language film. From the jaw-dropping opening episode in which passengers on a commercial flight realize they all share one thing in common a soured relationship with a mentally unstable man named Gabriel Pasternak (think of him as the Latin Keyser Söze) - to the freewheeling final episode displaying love's absurdities at the wedding reception from hell, this inspired anthology firmly puts its talented screenwriter/director Szifrón on the map of filmmakers to watch. (It's not surprising the Almodóvar brothers, Pedro and Agustín, co-produced this film. The same kind of cinematic madness courses in their veins.) In addition to his flawless camerawork. Szifrón demonstrates an astute literary sense in this film. Each tale in the sextet is self-contained, crafted in the Munro short-story tradition (both H.H. and Alice) of ordinary people and unordinary twists. While each segment stands on its own, all six are thematically linked by

a shot of vengeance served up with a karma chaser, a quenching gulp of human lunacy. None of the episodes disappoints, though

you may favor some over others, depending on your view as to what constitutes the best revenge. The most accomplished of the lot, however, is indisputable: the segment titled "El Más Fuerte" ("The Strongest"). Set on a lone desert highway, this brilliantly compact tale of escalated road rage evinces the folly of blind machismo, giving us a brutally funny and frightening portrayal of two grown men fighting like children on a playground, except the showdown here is to the death. (Watching these idiots trying to even the score may trigger a pang of regret over the last time you lost your shit over something stupid.) This centerpiece sequence is Spielberg meets Darwin on a secluded ribbon of road somewhere in the Patagonian Steppe, and it's a showstopper. It's just not a wild tale. It's a fucking insane one in this thing we call la vida loca. - Steve Davis ****

THE WRECKING CREW D: Denny Tedesco. (PG, 101 min.)

Denny Tedesco's film about the Wrecking Crew, a loose affiliate of West Coast session musicians who played on virtually every hit record of the Sixties and early Seventies, may seem like it follows in the footsteps of other recent documentary tributes to unsung artists like 2013's Twenty Feet From Stardom and 2002's Standing in the Shadows of Motown. In fact, Tedesco began filming this labor of love in 1996, when he first recorded his father, the late guitarist Tommy Tedesco, trading memories with fellow standout session players: drummer Hal Blaine, saxophonist Plas Johnson, and bassist Carol Kaye. Over the vears, Tedesco interviewed other key players in the scene, including former Wrecking Crew members Glen Campbell and Leon Russell, producers Herb Alpert and Lou Adler, and musicians Cher and Brian Wilson. (You can glean how many years the project stretched out not just from the quality of tape and shifting hair styles, but also in the jarring footnote of how many of the interviewees have since passed or had failing health.) Tedesco fils then took the film on the festival circuit in 2008, but he's spent the years since raising money to pay for the licensing of so many hit songs.

It was worth it: You don't tell this story without the music, and the film borrows a lot of energy from the soundtrack's regular bursts of the Beach Boys, Sam Cooke, and Nancy Sinatra. (Graphic inserts, inspired by the Sixties surf aesthetic, also give the film bounce, but can't hide its haphazard organization.) The film's modus operandi interspersing 20-second snippets of songs with slightly out-of-time talking-head clips - feels an awful lot like an infomercial for an especially rockin' Time Life compact-disc collection, but a very watchable one, with its wealth of archival audio and visual footage and impressive collection of talent willing to stroll down memory lane. The subject itself the musicians, the music - and the spirit of the thing - one son's obvious devotion - transcend the film's technical shortcomings. **1 Kimberlev Jones

Certainly it's an interesting moment as 25-year-old dancer Justin Peck, then a member of the corps de ballet (meaning, low man on the career ladder), is tapped to choreograph an original ballet - the 422nd for the New York City Ballet. Anyone with a zest for dance will find plenty of interest here, as Peck readies his ballet over a breakneck two months' time. Teeth may be gnashed when Lipes skates past the opening-night performance, but his point is perfectly articulated: It's not about opening night, it's about the sweat that gets you there. Chappie thrives on the perfectly silly transformation of an advanced technology into a common criminal, but the film strains to lend gravitas to its fairly lightweight premise. It may be hard to give much of a damn about the movie, but so long as the newly sentient Chappie is on screen - convincingly portrayed by Copley and a team of visual effects wizards - it's surprisingly easy to give a damn about the machine. When his crew sets up camp in New Orleans to pillage tourists in town for the Super Bowl, he takes Jess (Robbie) into his tutelage. She's a sly pickpocket, and he likes her moxie, as well as her "boobs," (As lovers, Smith and Robbie have decent chemistry; as bickerers, they're dynamite.) The trick of the con genre is to con the audience, too, and it's sometimes not clear until the credits roll if a script is engined by misdirection or just muzzy plotting. Focus has some hard swallows, including a comically inessential last-reel speech, but it's also got a unique syncopation about it that's admirable, if not entirely effective. (03/06/2015)

absurd blend that can only be labeled as Kafkaesque. The couple separated three years prior to the start of the film, but in order to officially divorce. Viviane (Ronit Elkabetz. marvelous) must be granted a gett from Elisha, who refuses to do so. This is the third in a trilogy by the Elkabetzes, but it's not the least bit necessary to have seen the earlier films before watching Gett. What ensues is an international game of cat and mouse, in which Penn's beleaguered Jim Terrier tries to piece together the identities of his would-be assassing while protecting the woman he loves from the danger sparked by his nefarious past. The Gunman's amped-up, bone-crunching action may keep the adrenaline flowing, but the film never really gels. 

SXSW 2015: Turnt Up & Dialed Down

PLAYBACK

A light drizzle fell, but the downpour eluded us. That felt like the story of **South by Southwest Music 2015**.

Sure it rained, but never enough for me to bust out the plastic poncho I kept in my back pocket all week. While weather forecasts predicted severe wetness throughout the music portion of the Festival, what actualized were two days akin to being in conversation with someone who spits when they talk.

The magnitude of the citywide convergence that emanates from SXSW also transpired less dire.

"It feels like the South by Southwest of the Nineties," said many a Conference veteran, pleased to be surrounded by others with similar occupational interests rather than vomiting spring break co-eds.

Of course, not being overrun by that ilk or industry hipsters is a double-edged sword. Club owners, bartenders, and pedicab drivers across the board informed "Playback" that

their earnings were down this year compared to the spoils of tourist dollars from the recent past. SXSW has long been considered "Christmas" for Austin's Downtown service industry.

Happily, the number of "You'll never believe what just happened!" moments remained proportionate to a festival with a global slice of musical genius.

"Dude, I just saw **Bushwick Bill** jump up onstage and rap!" was a common phrase last week when the half-pint cyclops invaded any platform in sight. Since this year's narrative arced across 30 years of hip-hop, **Too \$hort** to **Joey Bada\$\$**, the **Geto Boy** joined the scrum by collaborating with a quartet of locals: **Kingdom of Suicide Lovers**, **Amplified Heat**, **T Bird & the Breaks**, and **Brownout**, who seamlessly slipped into "Mind Playing Tricks on Me."

The Festival's glitziest surprise arrived on Thursday when tabloid pop star **Miley Cyrus** appeared alongside **Mike Will Made-It** at Fader Fort, lending vocals on sneaker jam "23" and enthusiastically announcing that she was, indeed, "high as fuck right now!" Additional celebrity sightings included *Ghostbusters* and zombie killers; **Bill Murray** took in performances by **Best Coast**, **Ghostface Killah**, and the **Zombies**, while **Norman Reedus** and **Melissa McBride** of *The Walking Dead* were caught rocking to eternal punks the **Damned**.

Lyle Lovett and Gary Clark Jr.

were both spotted strumming guitars on the sidewalk, likely part of an Esquire photo series devised by Andy Langer, who also provided the Austin Music Awards' most caustic moment. After being presented with a bottle of tequila in thanks for past AMA hosting duties, the local deejay and journalist, who doesn't drink, remarked, "That felt like a 'Fuck you.'" Wednesday's local prom sold out on the promise of ATX mythologizing - from the Texicana of heartfelt opener Billy Joe Shaver to head-spinning covers of Blaze Foley, Kris Kristofferson, and Lucinda Williams in the Viva Ia Diva segment - ultimately crowned by E Street Band guitarist Little Steven Van Zandt igniting the all-star Bump Band tribute to late Small Faces/Faces keyboardist lan McLagan. Less evocative was Snoop Dogg's keynote


interview led by **Ted** "what's a follow-up question?" **Chung**, aka the MC's manager. While the well-attended conversation mostly resembled a promotional event for the veteran rapper's new album and TV series, it did include a priceless story about **Willie**

Nelson out-smoking Snoop while kicking his ass at dominoes before the two buds shared a 20-piece bucket at a **KFC** in Amsterdam. Word is *Menace II Society* codirector **Allen Hughes** was scheduled to host the interview but got snowed in.

SXSW Film was flush with big-screen soundtracks: the startlingly intimate **Kurt Cobain** doc *Montage of Heck*, **Neil Young**'s re-edited 1982 comedy *Human Highway*, and the late, great **Les Blank**'s recently licensed *A Poem Is a Naked Person*, a 1974 portrait of **Leon Russell**, who earned a reputation as a good tipper after he dropped \$50 in local singer-songwriter **Wendy Colonna**'s jar during SXSW.

The **Jones Family** Will Make a Way, a film chronicling a family band and their No. 1 fan, wise-ass rock critic **Michael Corcoran**, came to life with a soul-stirring SXSW showcase on Thursday. Asked if he thought Corcoran, an atheist, would go to heaven, the gospel group's patriarch **Bishop Fred Jones** smiled broadly. "Yeah we gappe got him there"

"Yeah, we gonna get him there."



At SXSW, heaven is hype. By that measure of success, SXSW proved divine for Aussie rock songstress **Courtney Barnett**, Fort Worth vintage soul man **Leon Bridges**, and acoustic guitar explorer **Ryley Walker**, all of whom staked claim among critics as the next big thing. SXSW's huge hip-hop sector, so many of whom repeatedly implored audiences to "turn up" or "get turnt up" to the extent that I never wish to hear that term again, cast additional ranks of buzz artists between the extremes of Mississippi rap brethren **Rae Sremmurd** and British hip-hop poet **Kate Tempest**.

Among that genre's artists on the buzz bubble, there were indications of bright futures and dead ends. Toronto-based, locally managed MC **Tory Lanez** proved himself a live dynamo, literally walking atop the crowd at his packed showcase. Conversely, **Kanye West**'s recent G.O.O.D. Music signee **Holt** was utterly laughable, prefacing his set with warnings of how crazy the pit was about to get before launching into a limp mixture of Eighties New Wave beats and rapsinging that elicited zero crowd response.

As impossible as it might seem for underdogs to make a ripple in an ocean of 2,200 bands, influential ears were present at SXSW. That much was evidenced by *The Washington Post* hailing local punks **Flesh Lights** – specifically drummer **Elissa Ussery** – for a gripping Beerland set and similarly praising the **Whiskey Shivers**' "sweat and menace." The latter band likewise amused Sire Records founder **Seymour Stein**, who tagged along with "Playback" to see **A Giant Dog**. Music-rag-gone-website *Spin* demonstrated local love in championing the fashion sense of **Holiday Mountain**.

Stoned on the Throne: SXSW keynote Snoop Dogg

No fireworks concluded the appreciably mellow Music Conference. The final night's Latin music fiesta at Auditorium Shores got canceled due to wet grounds, and the mainstream yearned for a Kanye appearance that wasn't going to happen. SXSW tried unsuccessfully to book the hip-hop superstar, who also bailed on a **Jimmy Kimmel** Live! taping Friday at the Long Center.

As it played out, the hottest ticket in town Saturday was North Carolina's J. Cole, who stoked a packed Moody Theater with tracks from his recent chart-topper 2014 Forest Hills Drive. (A review of which concluded five nights of online coverage at Earache! austin chronicle.com/music.) After inhaling Cole's potent smoke and witnessing the intimidating inspiration of gangster Freddie Gibbs at a later club show, I closed out my SXSW watching Irish noise rockers Girl Band through a window outside Latitude.

As the young band on its first U.S. tour waged nervy sonic war on a capacity crowd, the most important man in Austin that week stood behind me watching their set. Presumably, SXSW co-founder and Managing Director **Roland Swenson** could've found V.I.P.

accommodations anywhere in town. "What's wrong, you couldn't get in?"

I joked. "This is a good spot, man," he replied.

SXSW POLICE BLOTTER

RUN THE JEWELS were attacked at the Spotify House on Monday. During a performance, an assailant stormed the stage and attempted to punch rapper **EL-P** before being bounced by **Killer Mike** and their bodyguards. Killer Mike sustained a torn rotator cuff during the incident.

AUSTIN'S PUBLIC ASSEMBLY AND CODE

ENFORCEMENT (PACE), along with Austin Fire and Health departments, issued 42 citations to event organizers during SXSW for infractions ranging from overcrowding to obstructing fire exits. In total, 24 events were shut down, though many were allowed to reopen the same night. Records show a verbal warning was given to an "unknown band playing the back of a van" in the Wendy's parking lot on Thursday.

I FOUND A HALF-GRAM OF MOLLY on the sidewalk Thursday night, indicating that some still can't differentiate SXSW from Bonnaroo.

A BRAWL BROKE OUT AT GYPSY LOUNGE

on Thursday evening, requiring pepper spray from on-site constables. The venue closed for the evening, displacing several performances, but reopened the next day.

SXSW SHOWCASING ARTIST YUNG GLEESH is wanted in Austin for sexual assault. The Washington, D.C., rapper stands accused of forcing himself on a passed-out woman at a mutual friend's house on Friday. He fled on foot before police arrived.

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There's No Place Like Home

2014-15 Austin Music Awards recap

For those born

locally and those

migrating here

daily, Austin in all

its ever-changing,

rapidly growing,

intransigently

nostalgic inertia

remains home.

Home can be such an ambiguously subjective notion. It hearkens where you're from, no matter how far away ambition takes you. Take rising stars Gary Clark Jr. and Shakey Graves, two locals now aligned with the road.

Home also beckons as a destination, a place and community to discover, as it did for Rock & Roll Hall of Fame inductee in both the Small Faces and Faces, Ian McLagan, who called Austin home for the final 20 years of his life. And home encompasses the people

you love, as 2015 Austin Music Awards queen Gina Chavez, who took home Best Musician, Album, Song, and Latin Artist of the Year, declares on her stellar 2014 sophomore LP, *up.rooted:* "All I know, my home is your heart."

The theme of this year's 33rd Austin Music Awards, led by organizers Celeste Quesada and house band leader Charlie Sexton,

announced "All Roads Lead to Austin." It could have equally acknowledged "All Roads Lead Home." For those born locally and those migrating here daily, Austin in all its ever-changing, rapidly growing, intransigently nostalgic inertia remains home.

Nowhere does that manifest more powerfully than in the city's music.

"This evening is not a competition. It's a celebration of Austin music," offered Austin-via-Austria transplant Ulrich Ellison in accepting Best Blues/Soul/Funk Band. "We are all in this together as a community, and we have to make people remember that music is the beating heart of Austin." Outlaw poet Billy Joe Shaver set the same theme in an opening musical benediction, extolling his founding Texan lineage with "Heart of Texas," and recent *Long in the Tooth* cuts "Hard to Be an Outlaw" and the biting "The Git Go."

AMA hosts Rick McNulty and Laurie Gallardo moved the three-and-a-half-hour ceremony along with energy for the soldout crowd, while Sexton, a musical wrangler if there ever was one, led the all-star house band of Michael Ramos, George Reiff, and

Conrad Choucroun through a dexterous stylistic range between awards.

Austin's female powerhouses shone throughout the evening, in plaques and performances. The Viva la Diva segment stunned with reworkings of Austinrelated songs, from Dana Falconberry's lazing psychfolk cover of Bill Callahan's "Jim Cain" and Jazz Mills' quaking take on Kris

Kristofferson's "Sunday Morning Coming Down," to the immaculately hard twang of Sunny Sweeney on Lucinda Williams' "Can't Let Go" and Carson McHone wringing Willis Alan Ramsey's "Painted Lady."

Tameca Jones belted a show-stopping R&B re-imagining of new Austin Music Hall of Fame inductee Blaze Foley's "If I Could Only Fly." Gina Chavez pulled poignantly on Patty Griffin's "Useless Desires," and Nina Diaz rocked aggressive to David Garza's "Disco Ball World."

Bringing together alumni from Stephen F. Austin High, Suzanna Choffel kicked off the reunion set before ceding the spotlight



to a solo Shakey Graves (Alejandro Rose-Garcia) side stage. Garcia then passed the baton to first period Spanish classmate Phranchyze (JJ Shaw), as the rapper worked the crowd. Saxophonist Elias Haslanger took the room to school by leading Sexton's band through an advanced level 10-minute jam.

Those courses set the stage for Eve Monsees and Gary Clark Jr. to reunite like days of Antone's past (and possibly future). The pair mounted a fierce guitar commencement alongside Sexton, with Monsees' "Thing for You" segueing into Clark's electrifying "Travis County."

Closing out the awards, repeat Band of the Year Riders Against the Storm and sweeping diva Chavez both delivered emotional and passionate speeches, and signaled the setting of a new foundation of elite Austin artists.

Ian McLagan's exuberant spirit hung over the entire evening, and as Sexton welcomed "Scrappy" Jud Newcomb and the Bump Band to the stage, the memorials transformed to enthusiastic tribute. With Ramos holding down Mac's role on keys, the band worked through a moving "Shalalala" from last year's United States and Faces' "Glad and Sorry."

Tameca Jones returned to burn through "(I Know) I'm Losing You," and Alejandro Escovedo reprised the Kinks' "I'm Not Like Everybody Else," which he recorded with McLagan before Mac's death. Patty Griffin's beautifully rendered "Never Say Never" set the emotional bar before special guest Steven Van Zandt emerged to lead the raucous climax with Small Faces' "Tin Soldier," and Faces' "Stay With Me" – Sexton, Newcomb, and the E Street Band guitarist expertly trading licks. On closing send-off "Ooh La La," the crowd joined in on the extended chorus.

McLagan's son, Lee, may have most appropriately expressed the spirit of the evening in accepting his father's AMA for Best Keys: "My dad would be thrilled to be here. He loved this city so much. I hope he gave you a good time, because you gave him a home."



Austin Urban Music Festival AUDITORIUM SHORES, FRIDAY 27 & SATURDAY 28

Reports of its death are bogus. Battle-tested and proven, R&B and other genres of urban music are alive and thriving. Even with Austin's black population dwindling, there's more than enough patronage to support the Austin Urban Music Festival year after year.

That the flourishing event this year marks its 10th anniversary defies any and all skepticism.

Headlining is the indomitable Robert Glasper Experiment from Houston, and R&B legends Blackstreet. Soulful vocalists Lalah Hathaway and Musiq Soulchild provide golden voices for Glasper's electrified jazz/R&B/hip-hop project. The diverse lineup includes established lotharios Eric Benet, Sebastian Mikael, and

Calvin Richardson, plus beatboxing pioneer Doug E. Fresh. Blues and reggae also represent. Begun in 2005 in the controversial aftermath of the Midtown Live fire, which razed the Cameron Road

club, Homer Hill and Donnie Little started the event as a way to continue Austin's soul music legacy. "It was a way to expand and diversify urban art, especially for East Austin," explains organizer Deuce Malone. "That's what the festival was borne out of – just to showcase the urban artists, and to show there's room for urban music here [in Austin]."

Fresh blood debuts in the form of Austin-born upstarts: burgeoning electric blues genius Jackie Venson, and multi-threat rapper sophisticate Troy Noka. The latter, a producer whose upbringing spreads him across the U.S. and into Europe, understands he has to take full advantage of these opportunities.

"Performing at the Austin Urban Music Fest is probably the best [experience] in my career so far," affirms Noka. "Not only because it's in my hometown, but because of the timing. I went through a lot in the past year. I know I am ready, because I needed to go through [the tough times]. I feel that the [right] timing is happening now. My time has arrived." – Kahron Spearman

BRIGHT LIGHT SOCIAL HOUR ALBUM RELEASE Stubb's, Friday 27

Five years after being named Band of the Year at the Austin Music Awards, Bright Light Social Hour finally returns with Space Is Still the Place. The wait was worth it. More prog-rock abounds than on their self-titled 2011 debut, but it's a natural progression with monstrous beats, scorching guitars, and interstellar overdrive. The sci-fi premise might not hold all the way through, yet the quartet's harmonies and muscular musicianship remains. Aspiring soul-folk singer Walker Lukens hits the gong first. – Jim Caligiuri

RODEO AUSTIN: KEVIN FOWLER Travis County Expo Center, Saturday 28

Bookended by Austin country outlaws Willie Nelson and Kevin Fowler, the latter a former metal maverick and now a local precursor to Eric Church, Rodeo Austin rides into the sunset of another year with a trademark yee haw. Last Sunday saw two elementary school girls in mutton bustin' – kids taming sheep – bettering their counterparts in barrel racing, with the honchos of bareback riding and bull riding neither trampled nor gored. Carnival rides, multiple music stages, pig races – don't wait another 50 weeks for true Texicana. – Raoul Hernandez

BIG BUSINESS/YOB Red 7, Tuesday 31/ Wednesday 1

Back-to-back nights of magisterial metallurgy pound us into an extreme spring - Judas Priest, Sleep, and Ufomammut, all in May Tuesday, Seattle trio Big Business stages its own Game of Thrones with the sovereign hammer of fourth LP Battlefields Forever, the same 1,000-yard stare as precursor Mind the Drift. Wednesday, Mike Scheidt, the Thorin Oakenshield of doom short, stout, fierce - leads Yob in Clearing the Path to Ascend, four 10- to 20-minute movements of magma metal. ATX's Skycrawler tears the heavens the first night, while Portlandian Kayla Dixon leads Witch Mountain the next. - Raoul Hernandez

TOBACCO/ HIS NAME IS ALIVE Mohawk, Wednesday 1

When pop hooks and power chords ain't enough, things get weird. A member of the organically strange Black Moth Super Rainbow, Tobacco keeps the eccentric synth-pop of the mothership going in his solo dealings, erupting the oddball voices, space-case lyrics, and catchy melodies of last year's *Ultima II Massage* all over the outdoor stage. Inside, Warren Defever brings his quarter-century-old ensemble His Name Is Alive inside to celebrate latest LP *Tecuciztecatl*, which finds the Detroiters moving from dream-pop quirk to majestic prog-rock. – *Michael Toland*

FUSEBOX FESTIVAL: TANYA TAGAQ SOUNDTRACKS NANOOK OF THE NORTH Stateside at the Paramount,

Stateside at the Paramount, Thursday 2

Fusebox Festival stages art in all its forms, but you won't find a more perfect cross-pollination than this. Blending real and staged sequences, the portrayal of the Inuit way of life in 1922 silent Nanook of the North set a standard for documentary film as artistic statement. 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

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

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
