MORE SUPPORT NEEDED

Dear Editor,

On December 11, 2014, the outgoing Austin City Council passed a resolution in support of immigration reform and, more specifically, for President Obama's Immigration Accountability Executive Action. This resolution follows the spirit of immigrant-friendly welcoming cities and counties, a movement also backed by the past Austin City Council. With a new mayor and nine out of 10 new Council members, it's time for Austin's elected leaders to renew their support for policies that bring needed relief and assistance to immigrants and their families.

All too often, city support for immigrants and their families who are currently seeking a legitimate way to live, work, and attend school in the Austin area seems uneven and reactive rather than proactive. The Austin Commission on Immigrant Affairs

failed to meet for almost three months - a period in which the president's executive action was created and subsequently tied up in court.

It's time for the current City Council and mayor to pass a new resolution that provides concrete support for the Immigration Accountability Executive Action. This could be done by enlisting city resources to extend a welcoming hand to those immigrants and their families who are currently seeking a legitimate way to live, work, and attend school in the Austin area. Additionally, the current Council should sign an amicus brief in support of the executive action. Wherever possible, city officials need to show that their support for immigrants and their families goes beyond the signatures on past resolutions.

NO FORMAL CITY Council meeting this week (next is April 16) while the committees get rolling and the reverberations proceed from the Zucker Report on Planning and Development. See "Public Notice," p.10, and "Council," p.12.

MEANWHILE. THE NEVER-ENDING District 4 campaign proceeds with defeated Council candidate Laura Pressley's contest of last year's

election and run-off, which arrived in court Monday before a skeptical visiting district judge, Daniel Mills. See "D4 Contest: Pressley Marches On," p.13.

WILLIAMSON COUNTY JUDGE Tim Wright surrendered to U.S. Marshals Tuesday after being indicted on nine federal charges of selling guns to a felon and helping smuggle weapons to Mexico. He faces up to 70 years in prison if found guilty.

APD ANNOUNCED A new training and education program designed to replace one-day suspensions handed down to officers for minor infractions. The policy is being hailed by the **Police Association** and Office of the Police Monitor, though some believe it will lead to less transparency; under the new provisions, those whose disciplines would have been made public will now stay under APD purview.

AISD COULD SEE a boost of between \$20 million and \$40 million under HB 1759, the new school finance legislation laid out by Public Education Committee Chair Jimmie Don Aycock. Aycock warns his bill is a short-term fix, and the system still needs a major overhaul (see "Lege Lines," p.14).

TEXAS RANGERS COULD start investigating corruption cases, as state Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, dumped plans to move the state's Public Integrity Unit to the Attorney General's office. However, she may not have the 19 votes she needs to move the PIU away from the Travis Co. District Attorney, who currently handles such cases.

NO HATE IN the Lone Star State: Unlikely allies Rep. Celia Israel, D-Austin, and Texas Association of Business CEO Bill Hammond joined with lawmakers on April 7 to oppose proposed "religious freedom" bills. Hammond called them "bad for business" and evoked the boycotts of Indiana after it passed similar anti-LGBT legislation.

IT WASN'T ALL flowers for Hammond: A furious Rep. Dan Huberty, R-Humble, said Hammond and Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce VP Drew Scheberle were "out of your mind" for opposing SB 149, adding graduation committees to evaluate students failing the STAAR end-of-course tests.

DEBATE CONTINUES IN Washington over a tentative, multi-country agreement with Iran on limiting its nuclear weapons research in exchange for a gradual lifting of economic sanctions. GOP presidential candidates and Congressional leadership denounced the agreement, but **President** Obama defended it as the best alternative to war.



Waging Peace OUR STRIDENT POLITICS DEMAND WAR AS THE ONLY OPTION

I long for a day in this country when Congressional leadership (not only proposals for war are debated as hotly and expansively as proposals for peace. Our polarized domestic politics are such that

when President Barack Obama suggests virtually any policy, the Republicans currently in charge of Congress reflexively bring out the long knives, determined to stop or overturn whatever it is proposed from the White House. The dozens of bootless votes to reject Obamacare (working better than predicted, by the way) remain the prima-

ry example, but right now I'm thinking of the outcry over the tentative agreement on the Iranian nuclear program. GOP presidential candidates are instantly declaring the deal dead by default, and the

Republican) is insisting that without Congressional approval, no agreement can go forward.

> It's no surprise, of course, that our contemporary political arrangements and its two major parties have become locked into a Manichean dance of death, orchestrated by the politics of money and the next election cycle. But I'm thinking here of the crucial military variation on that pattern; specifically, that U.S. military actions are provided little more than a

cursory review by either our media or our public officials. Yet when we seem to be on the verge of avoiding another major war as is the case with the multi-party negotiations with Iran - suddenly our politics turns

to chest-beating and threats, as though we are unable to conceive of a world in which diplomacy is actually preferable to military conflict - or (as the war lobby's hero, Winston Churchill, put it), "It's always better to jaw-jaw than to war-war."

Consider: In just how many places are we, in one form or another, currently at war? Afghanistan, Pakistan, Yemen, Iraq, Syria, Libya ... that list is only the most obvious, and if one includes areas of covert action, "assistance" to allies, or serious military presence, the list of countries jumps into the several dozens. How many of those conflicts have been subject to serious debate, let alone public controversy from the political leadership?

Generally, only when somebody suggests - as in the current instance - stepping back from the precipice of yet another war.

THE DEAL WE HAVE

Yet in terms of what we know of the agreement so far, it appears to be better than the conventional wisdom predicted possible. As reported, the final agreement anticipates: Iran will reduce its refining centrifuges by two-thirds, and its stockpile of nuclear fuel by over 90%. It will shift its research away from any work that could produce weapons-grade fuel; and it will allow extensive and necessarily intrusive inspections of all potential nuclear sites.

In exchange, the sanctions imposed by the U.S. and other countries (Germany, Russia, China, France, and Britain) would be gradually lifted – the timetable for that transition still needs to be worked out, and might yet fail. But it's especially worth noting that should Congressional (or Iranian) hard-liners prevail, and the deal be undermined or rejected, the U.S. partners in the negotiations are very likely to walk away from the largely U.S.-engineered sanctions – since the entire declared purpose of the sanctions was to produce an agreement with Iran like the one now under consideration.

THE ONLY REAL ALTERNATIVE TO DIPLOMACY ... IS ANOTHER WAR.

JUST A LITTLE WAR

It could well happen that the parties will not be able to conclude a final agreement by the June deadline. But what is striking about current U.S. opposition to the pending agreement is how little of it is based on any objections to the announced terms. Reflexively, the proposal has been attacked as "appeasement," or as "capitulation" to Iran, or with the empty alternative of "ratcheting up the sanctions" (a prospect for which we have no allies).

The only real alternative to diplomacy, as the president has pointed out, is another war. Some of the opponents (e.g., John Bolton) have actively campaigned for bombing Iran, as though this were some divine right of U.S. military power. Arkansas Sen. Tom Cotton – author of the idiotic Senate letter purporting to explain the U.S. Constitution to Iranian leaders – has proposed "several days" of bombing as not really a "war" at all. Arizona Sen. John McCain suggests that Israel should do the bombing (perhaps with its own nuclear weapons?) and the U.S. should stand by Israel's side. The Iranians, no doubt, would simply shrug.

Where have we heard this before? And how many more 21st-century wars do we need before we decide there are better routes to peace than more war? What's striking is how reflexively the public conversation turns to war talk whenever there's a remote chance of a peaceful international resolution. Yet how meek, mild, and ineffective are the official voices for peace, when the troops and weaponry are always ready at hand.

Now that **City Council** has solved its **staffing crisis** – hiring 13 new staffers for an estimated \$400,000 **at no cost to anyone whatsoever** (see last week's "Where Does Money Come From?") – much of the Council action shifts to the newly empowered **City Council committees**, all of which have now met at least once, and are starting to get down to substantive work.


The **Economic Opportunity Committee** meets Monday, April 13, from 2-5pm in the Boards & Commissions Room at City Hall, with the **Decker Lake Golf** proposal on the agenda. Vice-chair **Ora Houston** appeared to be the plan's lone champion at its last goround; it'll be interesting to see how the discussion shakes out. Like all committee meetings, it'll be streamed live at www.austintexas. gov/atxn, and also archived for later viewing.

The **Mobility Committee** is having a busy month, with three special-called meetings in addition to its regular schedule. They're taking on **taxi franchise** negotiations, the ongoing tension between **cabs and TNCs**, the new **Traffic Congestion Action Plan**, and a response to the controversial **CAMPO 2040 plan** that includes massive new MoPac

flyovers at Lady Bird Lake.

The first tangible bit of that traffic plan, APD's **Don't Block the Box** initiative, began Monday, targeting four intersections on Cesar Chavez Downtown; between 6-9am, APD issued nine red light citations, seven blocking intersection citations, two jaywalking tickets, and one for talking on a phone while driving.

With that as a backdrop, **Mayor Steve** Adler is giving his first **State of the City** address this Monday, April 13 at 6:30pm at

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Can AISD Enable "Equity"?

"Equity" is the current buzzword in education. It drove the 2014 Austin Independent School District board elections, as voters and candidates pondered how to give kids from poor homes, English language learners, and kids in special education programs the same options and opportunities as middle-class high achievers. But like "affordability" in the City Council races, overuse made the term nearly meaningless. As AISD is planning a study into equity issues across the district, board members are still defining their goal.

First, a clarification. The board has not begun an equity study; on March 30, AISD trustees voted to adopt a "framework" to develop the terms, processes, and protocols for an equity study. Now that framework passes responsibility to the newly minted AISD Board Oversight Committee on **Excellence Through Equity, Diversity, and** Inclusion. Consisting of four board members – plan creators **Ted Gordon** and **Paul** Saldaña, board Secretary Jayme Mathias, and At-Large Trustee Kendall Pace - the committee's job is to work out the next step. Saldaña's initial goal for the final study may seem minimal. He said, "I would be happy with statements that come with quantifiable data ... for me, that's enough." However, consider the headline background: an increase in Title I schools (those receiving federal aid for at-risk and lowincome students) from 50 schools in 2000 to 77 now, and from 35% of all students to 50%. As time goes on, he said, "We're going to be left with just serving poor kids. We're losing our middle-class students."

Education Austin President Ken Zarifis applauded the step, saying, "I think equity is a good thing, so I think studying equity is a very good thing." While the roots of the discussion and its issues are decades old, Zarifis called it timely for "a district and a city that's grappling with who we are."

A key driver behind this move was a 2012 report by the Texas Civil Rights Project (see "Report Highlights Inequities in AISD Funding," Sept. 21, 2012) that criticized the district for the way it allocated funds to campuses. A 2014 follow-up doubled down on endowments and parental volunteerism that again benefit wealthier neighborhoods, calling on the district to rebalance that equation through the creation of a districtwide foundation. Report author and TCRP staff attorney Abby Frank commended the board's study proposal, saying, "We're thrilled that it had broad support on the board, which we think reflects broad support in the community."

However, there is still much work to be done before any real study can begin. Saldaña wants the self-assessment to commence in June. Pace suggests it could take months of public consultation to fill out the framework. Then there is the big question: What does equity mean? Nowhere in the board discussions is there a precise definition. It will be the job of the new board committee to define "equity" - or, possibly, to establish a citizens' body to rough out a definition the board can finalize. That has to be accomplished before the actual study can be done.

That's deeply concerning for Pace, who fears the board is losing control of the process. "You already see the posturing beginning," she said, noting that special interest groups are filling the void with their own conceptions - ones that will generally benefit them. She said, "If you don't choose their definition, then we're going to disappoint them."

So what is equity? For TCRP attorney Frank, it means "equity in programs, equity

in level of teacher experience." She suggested the district look to the U.S. Department of **Education's Office for** Civil Rights for guidance. However, she warned, "We can talk about definitions all day, but that just gets us off-track."

Since so much of the discussion will come around to money, Zarifis argues that the first step must be separating out equity from equality. He said, "I compare it to the cartoon of three people of varying heights looking over a fence at a baseball game: The tall one can look over the fence, the middle one can just see over, and the shortest one can't see over." Equality is giving everyone the same size box to stand on, whether it

helps or not; equity is about ensuring everyone can see over the fence. That may seem optimistic, but he said, "our definition of equity has to be aspirational. It has to be that the kids who enter the system behind have the resources to leave the system equal with the kids who entered the system ahead."

Saldaña says the study isn't about fingerpointing, and can actually be a selling point. He has already received a list of 25 programs from Superintendent Paul Cruz that are having measurable impacts on campus achievement, and that could be readily implemented elsewhere. Saldaña said, "We need to shift from being on the defense all the time."

Saldaña is also optimistic about creating a definition for equity, noting that the district paid for a two-year study in 2007 that can be used as a base for discussion. But before the process goes too far, Pace thinks the board should offer "at least some operating parameters," if only to end wilder speculation. She said, "People think they're going to get more money, some people are afraid they're going to get less money, people think there's going to be another bond. I'm hearing all of these."

Her fear is that the district is setting off,

not just without a clear destination, but without a functioning compass. Her concerns are twofold. First, that this becomes another nebulous study that gets ignored. ("The district came out two years ago and said we under-invest

in our elementaries." she said. "but we buried that.") Second, that this becomes a rerun of the 2011 Facility Master Plan debacle (see "What the Task Force Wrought," May 27, 2011), or the ongoing free-for-all about the new South high school, where a lack of clarity from the board has let speculation run riot. "The more we talk about it in these sweeping generalizations," Pace said, "the more disappointing it will be." – Richard Whittaker

COUNCIL: MORE BRISKET, MORE STAFF

The next regular City Council meeting is Thursday, April 16, facing a draft agenda fairly heavy with zoning cases, as they continue their organization attempt to segregate their agendas. It's just as well they take a break this week, after last week's (April 2) meeting, where they walked into a couple of hornets' nests of their own design. The headline grabber was the (in theory) well-intentioned attempt to draft a solution to the burning problem of **barbecue smoke**; sponsored by District 3 Council Member Pio Renteria (with co-conspirators Mayor Steve Adler, Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo, and CM Greg Casar). It was a response to a couple of fairly specific neighborhood complaints – concerning Terry Black's Barton Springs joint (beneath a residential bluff), and la Barbecue on East Cesar Chavez (near some homes) - that need specific solutions. (Renteria, to his own embarrassment, referred to the latter as "La Bare" - "I don't know where my mind is at.") Council's initial draft was contemplating expensive "scrub-

bers" for every barbecue smokestack in town; by the time the

public and various chefs (notably Aaron Franklin and Hoover Alexander) reacted, Renteria and company were withdrawing that recipe and calling on stakeholders to convene, discuss, consult, mediate - and maybe come back with some flexible solution in some undefined future. In the meantime, the neighborhoods (and restaurants) with the specific problems will return to their respective corners.

The other consternation was the still-simmering plan to add staffers to the mayor's office, which had gone through a committee, with initially moderated expectations, and instead returned to Council as an amplified plan to add staff for the mayor - in the end, three more paid staffers rather then the five he had originally requested - and also an additional staff member to each Council member's office. The politics of 10-1 had overcome the fiscal hesitation - although the new staffing is temporary (until Sept. 1) and budget staff said the funding (about \$400,000) could be found in the existing budget, apparently without using staff vacancies.

Only Tovo and Delia Garza voted against the measure, Garza saying the inevitable expansion of staff under 10-1 was already sufficient to the need, and warning that her colleagues would find it difficult to fund other service needs in the next budget cycle. (Indeed, a spare \$400,000 tends to loom large in August.)



D4 Contest: Pressley Marches On

The ongoing attempt by defeated City Council candidate Laura Pressley to overturn the results of the **District 4 election** finally arrived in court on Monday, as her election contest against Council Member Greg Casar received a preliminary hearing from visiting Judge Daniel H. Mills at the Travis County Courthouse. Though the contest is legally framed as Pressley v. Casar, and both candidates and their legal teams were on hand, the substantive questions addressed longstanding Travis County voting procedures, and whether they are adequate to confirm the results of the Nov. 4 election, the Dec. 16 run-off (which Casar won by approx. 65% to 35%), and a Jan. 6 recount that precisely confirmed the run-off result.

Pressley continues to insist that "we don't know" the outcome of the election because of alleged mistakes in election procedures and those claims are directed not at Casar, but at Travis County and Travis County Clerk Dana DeBeauvoir, who said after the hearing that Pressley and her legal team are "using terms with her own definitions, that don't make sense to the rest of the elections world." At the heart of Pressley's case - laid out for the court by her attorney, David Rogers - is her insistence that the "cast vote records" printed and recounted in January do not meet the statutory definition of "ballot images" described in state law, although the Texas Secretary of State (supervisor of elections) has already rejected the Pressley interpretation. Casar's attorney, Chuck Herring, added that all the relevant authorities (city, county, state, federal) define cast vote records "ballot images," and Pressley has "a mountain to climb" to show otherwise.

During the hearing, the judge appeared unpersuaded by Rogers. It would appear, he pointed out, that the District 4 line vote appearing on the "ballot summary" – inspected by a voter prior to finally casting a ballot –



is indeed a "ballot image." Rogers objected to that interpretation, and also to the judge's informal offer to hand-count the already printed cast vote records himself. The judge is hoping to update pleadings and complete more limited discovery by the end of April, for a trial – if necessary – that could occur as early as June.

Pressley said she was "very encouraged" by the hearing, and believes the county will



not be able to produce "ballot images" – as she defines them. Herring says the judge will likely be receptive to a summary judgment rejecting Pressley's arguments, because her team has provided no authority for their position on ballot images. "I think they've got a big hill to

climb," he said, "to convince the judge they're right, on a unique, novel interpretation." - Michael King

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There's an unusual fight brewing on the right, and it all revolves around signs. Specifically, how big a sign must Texans display in their windows if they don't want guns in their businesses? It may sound like a minor issue, more typographical than legal, but it's become an unexpected consti-

tutional clash, as to whether property rights or **Second Amendment rights** should hold sway.

The grim reality is that gun control advocates expect that the open carry rules in Senate Bill 17 will pass, and that Speaker Joe Straus will not get in its way (in part, as a sop to gun groups for when the House kills the wildly unpopular campus carry). So the

important struggle is to limit its excesses, with local opt-out and protections for private property. House Bill 2405 is one such bill: Currently, a business that doesn't want people with concealed firearms on its property must put a huge sign in its window. If open carry passes, they'll need two, and they will have to comply precisely with the



law. At an April 7 hearing, bill author state Rep. Poncho Nevárez. D-Eagle Pass. recalled a recent trip to the cinema with a friend. He said, "One of the things my friend likes to do is test businesses. ... I don't know why he likes doing that." The cinema had a huge sign saying that con-

cealed firearms were not allowed. However, it didn't meet the exact wording and font size required by the law, so his friend could bring his gun in, even though the owners clearly didn't want it. In testimony, Texas Gun Sense noted that the signs were deliberately designed to make life difficult for businesses, and that there are websites such as Texas3006.com,

which lists every business where the sign is out of compliance. HB 2405 just makes the sign simpler and smaller, so businesses can print their own.

Unsurprisingly, the Texas State Rifle Association opposes the measure, saying that handgun owners should be able to see the sign from the parking lot. Equally unsurprisingly, gun control group Moms Demand Action backs the bill: Anna Kehde, volunteer leader with the Texas chapter, explained that the current law requires a sign "as big as a pony," and noted that other states with concealed carry, including Kansas, Illinois, and South Carolina, allow similar, less burdensome signs. Recently, MDA picked up a surprising ally in the Texas Association of Business.

In March, the TAB (which generally restricts its opinion to fewer taxes and more high-stakes school testing) weighed in. The group sent a letter to the members of the Homeland Security and Public Safety Committee, stating its position on the open carry legislation in HB 910, specifically that it "continues to allow a business to choose if handguns are allowed at their place of business with no additional burdens put on the employer." This is not the first time this session the normally hard-line TAB has veered away from the Republican party line. CEO Bill Hammond has publicly opposed ending the DREAM Act. and criticized the raft of anti-LGBT legislation, arguing it could alienate businesses and invoke boycotts.

SHORT LINES

Austin Mayor Steve Adler joined a demonstration on the Capitol steps against pending anti-LGBT legislation on April 4. He warned that bills echoing Indiana's so-called religious freedom act could damage Austin's reputation as a liberal and inclusive city, which is one of the reasons that the businesses and creatives so vital to Texas' economy are prepared to move here... Democrats and immigrant rights activists are furious at how Republicans are handling their latest effort to take away instate tuition from noncitizens at Texas universities (i.e., repealing the DREAM Act). SB 1819 by Sen. Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels, was sent to the Veteran Affairs & Military Installations Committee, not Higher Education. In her testimony at the April 6 meeting of the committee's Subcommittee on Border Security, Center for Public Policy Priorities Executive Director Ann Beeson fumed about false rhetoric from bill advocates, saying "resident noncitizen students do not 'take away slots from Texas citizen students," and noting they still have to go through the same application process. The Republican-dominated subcommittee ignored her testimony, and sent the bill to the full committee... The fight over HB 40, San Angelo Republican Drew Darby's bill to strip cities' ability to regulate drilling and fracking within their borders, has become a cold war. The Texas Municipal League had openly opposed the bill, which undercuts the powers of cities like Denton to regulate what happens in their cities. However, the TML and bill advocates the Texas Oil & Gas Association have signed an agreement to not push for any more amendments, either strengthening or weakening the measure ... "It's always fun when you're getting to cut taxes," Ways and Means Committee Chair Dennis Bonnen, R-Angleton, gleefully declared to right-wing news site Texas Insider as he announced the most aggressive tax cuts vet: a 25% cut in the margins franchise tax (up from the 15% proposed by the Senate), and a cut in the state sales tax. Bonnen forecasts that a resultant increase in economic activity will not leave the state in a fiscal hole, but with the state facing a startling drop in oil revenues as prices crash, his optimism seems premature.

House Bill 80

How time changes. A decade ago, Tom Craddick was the bane of the Texas House: an archconservative who, as speaker, sent his foes scurrying. As a backbencher, he has become the model of bipartisan conviviality and common-sense legislation, on no issue more so than on championing the ban on texting while driving.

House Bill 80 makes futzing with your phone while driving a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of \$25-99, rising to \$100-200 for subsequent offenses. If the bill passes, you'll still be able to use the GPS on your phone, or make a call, but the incredibly distracting and therefore dangerous act of selecting, sending, or reading a text behind the wheel would be banned.

According to the Texas Department of Transportation, 40 cities around Texas have similar bans. That includes Austin, where the hands-free ordinance took effect Jan. 1.

Since then, over 1,000 people have been ticketed. Such local ordinances would stay in place if they are stricter than the state law: For example, the \$500 fine would stay in place locally. But the new law could end the annoying Austin loophole of letting people text at intersections, sometimes missing the light in the process.

Here's the bad news. Gov. Rick Perry vetoed almost exactly the same measure back in 2011. Back then he called it "a government effort to micromanage the behavior of adults." Considering this was a man regularly chauffeured

the one block from the Capitol to the Governor's Mansion (no, not kidding), his knowledge of driving habits may be limited.

Undeterred, Craddick tried again in 2013, but his HB 63 stalled in committee as legislators blew a gasket over reproductive rights. Now he is back with HB 80. The committee process undoubtedly strengthened the measure, including an amendment by Rep. John Smithee, R-Amarillo, requiring

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

UT Basketball Scores New Leadership

RICK BARNES EXITS, SHAKA SMART TAKES THE HELM

If UT's long-tenured men's basketball coach **Rick Barnes** felt bamboozled by his March 28 firing, after Athletic Director **Steve Patterson**'s verbal commitment to keep him, it was nothing to how his roster felt. They found out on Saturday, when the rest of the city did, and then watched as he took a job with the **University of Tennessee** the following Tuesday. On Sunday, Barnes, who could not be reached for comment before leaving for Tennessee, said at a press conference that he was initially told by Patterson that his job was safe. Then he was given a decision: Fire assistant coaches or be fired himself.

"I've been carried by a lot of great people here. Every one of them said, 'No, don't give this up," Barnes recounted. "I couldn't do that. If I'm hired to do the job, and if I don't do the job, then I can be fired. But while I'm doing the job, I have to be able to use my judgment about who will be around me."

The 60-year-old Barnes had

coached at UT since 1998, with a steady hand and a few bright blips: consensus No. 2 player in the NBA **Kevin Durant**, 6-foot pickpocket **T.J. Ford**, plus solid rotation spark plugs **D.J. Augustin** and **Cory Joseph**. But after yet another early loss in the NCAAs, this time to Butler, rumors began to swirl about a possible shake-up – and for good reason this time.

"For me, it's a little different; I'm not going to be here next year anyway, but for [the rest of the team] they're going through a lot of emotions right now," graduating forward **Jonathan Holmes** told the *Chronicle* last week. "We lost, and then hearing that coach is going to be gone – I'm sure they're trying to figure out who's coming in and what the team's going to look like next year. I'm sure they're going through a lot of things in their heads, and just sitting back and trying to cope with everything.

"I saw a lot of the good that he did in this place," Holmes added. "It was hard to hear that he's going to leave this place."

Holmes spent four seasons with Barnes beginning in 2011, when UT was eliminated by Cincinnati in a first-round match-up. Last year, after falling to Baylor in the **Big 12**, Texas went into the **NCAA Tournament** as an at-large bid, and progressed to the third round before losing to the Michigan Wolverines. As head coach, Barnes took Texas to two **Elite Eights**, and the **Final Four** in 2003.

"He gave us everything he could. For me personally, he made me into the player I am today. Even having a chance at playing in the next level – I give him all the credit for



that," Holmes said. "This season, we can't put it all on him. There was a stretch there where I was averaging three points – that has nothing to do with coaching. We lost a lot of games by two or three possessions. We weren't


playing well. What the game plan is, going into the game – if you can't put the ball in the basket, like we weren't doing, you're not going to win. It doesn't have to do with coaching, it has to do with our jobs."

But by the end of the week, the coach that had been with the team since they'd joined the program wasn't even headline fodder anymore. That honor went to basketball firebrand **Shaka Smart**, who leaves **Virginia Commonwealth University** after five years and a Final Four appearance (the school's first), despite heavy lobbying by Richmond businesses, offering free brisket and lap dances. Patterson introduced Smart at his first press conference April 3, saying, "He's the only person I interviewed." At press time, Patterson had not returned the *Chronicle*'s calls for comment.

"I feel like at Texas this is an unbelievable opportunity for me as a basketball coach to help a group of young men pursue excellence," Smart said, after introducing his family and thanking past mentors. "As I think about the University of Texas, that's what comes to mind: excellence."

"I've spent a lot of time with this program, and this is a great university – a great place to be," Holmes said, days before the announcement. "So, there are a lot of resources here that they'll have. I just hope the best for whoever comes in next. Hopefully, they can get over the hump of winning a national championship."

Smart had better. UT brass has proclaimed that while football trumps almost everything in Texas, winning is really king. – Nina Hernandez



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
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NO RIGHT TO A GOOD ATTORNEY

On Feb. 2, 2001, moments after being confronted by the San Antonio policeman who would soon learn of his warrants, 22-year-old **Manuel Fernando Garza** escaped Officer **John Riojas**' grip and sprinted down the street. Riojas gave chase and eventually caught up with Garza, who continued to resist arrest. Riojas pulled his gun out, and Garza took it from him. Garza fired one shot that ended up killing Riojas on the spot.

Garza was arrested Feb. 4 and appointed an attorney on Feb. 14. He hardly stood a chance at escaping the death penalty from that moment on.

On Feb. 21, one week after being appointed by the court to Garza's case, his attorney withdrew on account of being unqualified to argue capital cases. Two new attorneys were placed on Garza's case that day, but 17 months later, when the first chair withdrew so that he could go on his vacation, neither had put any investigative work in

had put any investigative work in. Same goes for the investigator appointed to Garza's case May 8, 2001: He ultimately left the case after losing his license; he had not made any requests for discovery.

Vincent Callahan was then appointed as Garza's first-chair counsel on July 19, 2002. He was friends with **Edward Camara**, Garza's second chair, and, according to Camara, "pretty well not very reliable as far as putting necessary work on a case." The two devised a plan: Camara would handle the jury selection, and Callahan would work on Garza's punishment. Both decided to dedicate no resources to mitigation, aside from a mitigation specialist who billed Garza's camp for 12.75 hours. A psychologist also met with Garza for two hours before being told (by Callahan and Camara) to cut his efforts short. Jury selection began Aug. 30 and lasted

over a month. The trial, held in October, took

less than one-third of that time. Garza was convicted of capital murder on Oct. 24; he received his death sentence five days later.

San Antonio attorney **Michael Gross** attempted to argue ineffective assistance of counsel in a 2004 application to the state for a writ of habeas corpus. The 162-page writ laid out nine claims, but it was denied in 2008. A federal habeas petition was stayed the following year while Garza exhausted his remedies at the state level, and an

amended version was filed and then denied by the federal court in 2012. In 2013, an appeal to the Fifth Circuit was also denied, as was a subsequent appeal for a certificate of appealability. A 2014 writ of certiorari to the U.S. Supreme Court was denied in June.

Now 35, Garza is set for execution next Wednesday, April 15. He'll be the sixth Texan executed this year and 524th since the state's reinstatement of the death penalty in 1976. – Chase Hoffberger

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Joining Forces Against HIV WRIGHT HOUSE REOPENS UNDER ONE ROOF

On Friday, the **Wright House Wellness Center** will close its doors for five days. When they re-open on April 15, the nonprofit will at last be under one roof. For the past 18 years, the center, which serves Travis County residents living with HIV, has been operating out of two buildings miles apart from one another. "This move allows us to really come together as an organization," says WHWC Executive Director **Leah Graham**. "It'll also help our clients move more easily through the organization."

With a swell in local HIV-positive diagnoses and the threat of state budget cuts, the nonprofit's move couldn't come at a more crucial time. As of February 2014, **Austin/ Travis County Health and Human Services Department** estimated that more than 5,000 Austin/Travis County residents were living with HIV. If that

number sounds high, well, it is – in fact, it's gone up by 40% in the previous eight years. And, in 2013, 4,309 Texans tested newly positive, including 249 Travis County residents, according to the **Texas Department of State Health Services**. That gives Texas the thirdhighest HIV infection rate in the country.

"About 1,100 people in Travis County don't know

they're positive," says Graham. "It's important that we identify those folks, get them into care, and get them on treatment." In 2012, the Centers for Disease Control and **Prevention** reworked its approach to fighting HIV. Now the CDC - and organizations receiving federal funding – primarily focuses on High-Impact Prevention, which targets high-risk populations, and linking newly diagnosed individuals to medical care. "Now there's a bigger push to get people tested," says Graham, "and that bridge between prevention and care has case managers working closer together, which means people are not falling through the cracks."

Despite the proven effectiveness of prevention strategies, the rising numbers are alarming. Both Graham and Paul E. Scott, the executive director of AIDS Services of Austin, believe complacency plays a large role in the shift. "Some people have decided HIV is curable or treatable so they don't feel like it's a consideration," says Scott. While testing positive is no longer a death sentence, and today's medications are far superior to the early AZT cocktails, HIV is still a serious health issue. "We're definitely seeing a change in people living with HIV, but we still have clients that are dying," Scott explains. "It all depends on when they test [positive], and are they able to stay in care? Are they able to get the support needed in

order to take medication? At best, it's managing lifelong medication plus co-issues from HIV and meds."

Graham, who's been working with WHWC since 1999, agrees that while fewer people are dying, a broader spectrum of individuals is being infected, and numbers are rising for young gay and bisexual men, women – specifically African-American women –

and youth. In 2013, Texas teens between the ages of 15 and 19 made up 10.7% of those infected (DSHS). "I have a 14-year-old daughter, and we talk about it quite a bit," Graham says. "I don't think it's ever too early to start educating."

Unfortunately, the Republican-controlled **Texas House of Representatives** doesn't see eye-to-eye with prevention workers. On March 31, the House approved an amend-

ment to the state's budget that would cut \$3 million from HIV funding and reallocate it for abstinence-only programs. Though the cuts are far from finalized, Graham and Scott are concerned. "We need to provide a menu of options to meet people where they're at abstinence only doesn't do that," explains Graham. "If folks aren't getting prevention and safer sex education, it could lead to increased HIV positive

cases, which would lead to increase of service, which means more funding will be needed." Aside from the poor track record of absti-

nence-only programs, Scott adds: Waiting until marriage does not resonate with gay men, especially seeing as same-sex marriage is still illegal in Texas. "Prevention work has high success rate," says Scott. "And Austin has one of the highest retention rates for keeping people in care. Moving these well-proven dollars to a program that doesn't have good results is scary." The budget amendment is now on its way to the Senate. Once the Senate makes its recommendations, the differences between the two versions of the amendment will be sorted out before the 2015 legislative session ends on June 1.

As it's unclear if the cuts will come to fruition, local organizations plan to continue business as usual. ASA and WHWC are two of Austin's oldest HIV organizations, and frequently work together. WHWC, which began in 1988 (under its original name Austin Immune Health Clinic), serves a five-county area, and works primarily with African-American and Latino men who have sex with men, as well as African-American women.

ASA, on the other hand, works primarily with young gay men, men who sleep with men, and intravenous drug users. Both organizations have mobile testing vans that commute to community hubs including bars, apartment complexes, and rec centers – places where clients can easily access testing without being recognized. "Stigma plays a huge role in these communities," says Graham. "People are afraid to go to local clinics [to get tested] because they don't know who they might see."

However, stigma is exactly what organizations such as **Out Youth** are trying to eliminate. The 25-year-old nonprofit serves LGBTQ youth living in Central Texas. Most Mondays from 4:30 to 6:30 they run KYSS (Knowing Your Status is Smart), during which they offer testing and risk-reduction counseling for anyone between the ages of 14 and 23. "Most of our clients are getting tested for their first time," says **Keisha Martinez**, Out Youth's clinical services director. "Our goal is to promote healthy testing in a very positive space."

On April 25, these three organizations (and many more) will join forces to bike in the **16th Annual Hill Country Ride for AIDS**, which benefits 10 local organizations. "It's one of my favorite events," says Graham. "It's always a community of love, but for a couple of days it's even more loving." – *Sarah Marloff*

Help Oust Junk Science From Our Public Science Museums

We've all seen those touchy-feely TV ads with baby deer, butterflies, and sylvan streams – claiming that Amalgamated Contamination Inc. is nature's best friend. There's a word for such hokum: greenwashing.

Leave it to the **Koch brothers**, however, to invent a whole new category of greenwashing. Doling out millions of their oil-smeared greenbacks, David and Charles have been buying their way onto the boards and into the exhibits and studies of elite museums of science. The fossil-fuel billionaires are using the academic and cultural prestige of these establishments to wash their filthy reputations and to spew the self-serving balderdash that climate change is a natural phenomenon, not one caused by polluting profiteers like them.


Astonishingly, David Koch was able to purchase a seat on the decision-making boards of the **American Museum of Natural History** and of the **Smithsonian's natural history museum**. The exalted Smithsonian has even allowed him to fund a Hall of Human Origins that promotes David's junk science fantasies. I know museums are scrambling for money, but come on – an infamous science-denier directing a science museum?

Maybe not for long. A new kind of museum has been started to highlight economic and political forces that shape (or misshape) nature. Called **The Natural History Museum**, it's outing the Kochs and other greenwashers who're invading the public's science spaces ... and invading science itself. More than merely exposing the invaders, however, this upstart museum is recruiting prominent scientists, activating museum staffers, and rallying you and me into a spirited cultural campaign that literally can oust these hucksters, reject their tainted money, and throw junk science out of our centers of real science.

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Eastward Expansion

Real estate prospecting on the Eastside

For years, East Austin residents have decried gentrification. As Austin property values appreciate exponentially, developers have descended upon the city to capitalize on the hot real estate market. But the positive impact of renewal and the rebuilding of deteriorating neighborhoods is having a corrosive side effect on longtime, lowerincome residents, in many cases forcing their displacement from neighborhoods

they've long called home. The lower Eastside is increasingly dotted with high-end restaurants and chic bars where homes once stood. Many residents seem surprised at the brisk pace of new development. Long seen as home to a largely Latino working class, the area is quickly being transformed to appeal to an affluent customer base.

"I was born and raised here for the past 35 years, and I am heartbroken," said Bertha Delgado, president of the East Town Lake Citizens Neighborhood Association. "I'm also angry. All of our minority-owned businesses that we valued are gone. It's more of a devastation to see everything rapidly go without anything slowing down."

The transformation has taken place over the course of several years, dating to the early Aughts when property values began to blow up, but the February demolition of a longtime Latino-owned piñata shop arrived as a resounding riptide. In their rush to capitalize on SXSW by staging a party on the land, F&F Real Estate Ventures – co-owned by Darius Fisher and Jordan French – simply demolished the Jumpolin party supplies store at 1401 E. Cesar Chavez, with no effective notice to Sergio and

Monica Lejarazu, the Mexico-born couple who had operated the store for the last eight years. The demolition is seen by community leaders as a clear illustration of developer greed and insensitivity to established neighborhoods from which they now seek to profit. Subsequent comments by French in an interview with CultureMap – comparing the Lejarazus to roaches and implying Jumpolin may have actually been a front for illicit activity – had an unsavory undertone of bigotry. Along the way, the Eastside has emerged as ground zero in the reignited gentrification debate. "I think that community was a little slow in recognizing where this whole thing was going to go," said Mercedes Lynn de Uriarte, associate professor at the UT-Austin School of Journalism, who led a three-year study on the sector's gentrification with her graduate students. She pinpoints bolstered commercial development in the area as more

recent: "They started gentrifying there in 2008, and there were early warning signs with spikes in property taxes."

De Uriarte said gentrificationfueled displacement of residents often disproportionately affects minorities. Moreover, Austin's his-

tory of segregation concentrated Latinos and African-Americans on the Eastside via the 1928 Austin Master Plan. "It has to do with class more than anything," de Uriarte said. "But because class falls along racial and ethnic lines, minorities are often the first victims." According to Neighborhood Scout – a data-rich portal detailing neighborhood statistics – the East Cesar Chavez neighborhood is not only predominantly Hispanic, but one of the most Mexican enclaves in the country, with 58.9% of residents with Mexican ancestry. Academic studies reinforce the conclusion. In February, the University of Toronto's Martin Prosperity Institute named the Austin/Round Rock area as the most economically segregated large metro area in the U.S. The gap between rich and poor is growing nationwide, according to the report, but it's more dramatically seen in Austin, with its high population density.

What's striking about the report is that the division is primarily between the east and the west – but if West Austin and its accompanying suburbs have long been out of the question for lower-income families, the Eastside is becoming unaffordable as well. Neighborhood Scout weighs in with its statistics to illustrate this widening chasm: the East Cesar Chavez "median real estate price is \$314,236, which is more expensive than 91.7% of the neighborhoods in Texas and 76.3% of the neighborhoods in the U.S."

An earlier study by UT-Austin's Institute for Urban Policy Research and Analysis showed a 5.4% decline in the city's African-American population between 2000 and 2010 – a trend partially attributable to gentrification. Austin earned the distinction of being the only fast-growing city in America losing African-Americans.

IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD, BUT NOT OF IT

Cody Symington, a co-owner of the popular Cenote cafe at 1010 E. Cesar Chavez, acknowledges his own role in adding to the neighborhood's gentrification. But in arriving to the neighborhood with a new eatery, he said he tries to be sensitive to the community - an attribute likely informed from spending his formative years on the Eastside. He reached out to the owners of Jumpolin shortly after their business was demolished to offer his space for a fundraiser for rebuilding costs. On March 28, the Lejarazus raised nearly \$2,000 in sales of diminutive keepsake piñatas and cascarones. A concurrent fundraiser on GoFundMe has raised more than \$5,000. The couple hopes to find a new site for their business and is currently operating at a borrowed site at 4926 E. Cesar Chavez.

"We were, for lack of a better term, gentrifiers when we moved into East Cesar Chavez," Symington said. "But we knew we were moving into a community that was already there." Rather than razing a building to suit his needs, Symington set out to preserve the older building where Cenote is now located, once a private home. He quickly learned the city's rules - particularly those related to parking - make preservation difficult. "We moved here in 2010, but opened in 2012," he said, attributing the gap between move-in and opening to back-andforth discussions related to parking issues. "Unfortunately," he said, "the city does make it extremely difficult to preserve a building. It boils down to parking."

But he knew saving the old building was an important part of entering into the established neighborhood: "Our goal was not to be gentrifiers, but we knew that's what people would call us. I actually lived in the neighborhood in 2007. I can't now; I can't afford it." CONTINUED ON P.24


That sensitivity – coupled with Cenote's goodwill toward their former neighbor, Jumpolin – has helped ingratiate the selfdescribed gentrifiers into the neighborhood. But often, residents feel slighted at the tone-deafness of other recent arrivals clumsily trying to assimilate into the neighborhood culture.

Amy Thompson, a neighborhood advocate, recently contacted Cycleast to inquire about the fate of the landmark La Lotería mural, only to discover it had been painted over by an artist commissioned by SXSW organizers ahead of the music festival. The resulting artwork by Australian-based graphic artist Rone was culturally out of sync, she said. "According to Rone, he was told to paint something respectful of the neighborhood," Thompson wrote in an email. "So he chose a portrait of a local girl. He obviously meant well, but this is nothing more than tokenism and further insult to injury." The new mural was commissioned by POW! WOW! Hawaii, which partnered with SprATX and SXSW to create murals at four Austin locations for the SXSW Impossible Wall Project. According to the description of the project on the SXSW website, it "brings together local artists and international artists to transform ordinary walls throughout the downtown area into large public works of art for the Austin community."

Cycleast owner Russell Pickavance - who reopened his shop at 1619 E. Cesar Chavez last year - acknowledged that painting over the mural was his idea. While he understands residents' concerns about gentrification, he prefers to see the trend in a positive light given its tactics of renewal and refurbishment of older neighborhoods. "I am the one who requested it get painted over; it's all on my shoulders," Pickavance said, noting the idea was met with enthusiastic approval from his landlord, property owner Louis Joseph. "The mural had been there for a long time, and I wanted to revitalize this space and show people we were here. Murals naturally fade over time. You can touch it up, but if you touch it up, aren't you remaking it? I wanted to continue the heritage of the painted wall. My thought was to continue that tradition of a mural on a wall, but every year doing a new mural."

Now that the old, recognizable mural is gone, Pickavance also conceded he may have been too hasty in not fully considering its cultural currency: "Where I was shortsighted is that I didn't think about the fact the people who painted it might still be in the neighborhood. I definitely know part of me made a mistake. I'm aware I've hurt some people. But this is being in the middle of trying to maintain the cultural heritage of the community and have new art and have it continue to be vibrant. That was my intention."

Graffiti artist Armando "Lace" Martinez sees the increasing eradication of the neighborhood's artistic expressions as further evidence of a changing landscape in the neighborhood where he's spent his entire life. The mural "has nothing to do with Eastside culture," he said. "It looks nice and neat and real good, but it doesn't fit the



neighborhood. We've had murals up but they've been painted over once the buildings are gone or they change owners."

He and other artists are now joining Delgado in an effort to save the community's remaining murals. For his part, Pickavance noted he has offered to bring in the original artists to paint a new mural in the rotating artwork plan. He also notes his commitment to his new neighborhood, pointing to the large community space he included in the shop – four times the size of his previous location at 501 Pedernales – as further evidence of his genuine respect.

French's own post-demolition theories about Jumpolin – positing it as a possible front for illegal activity – offer up yet another example, an extreme one, of not only tone-deafness but complete lack of underideas: "What a great business and concept," the website reads. "Home based, unique, low overhead, minimal startup costs, virtually no competition and no limitations on business growth and expansion."

In a previous interview, Sergio Lejarazu said there was more to it than that: "When you talk about a piñata store, people think there's no investment and they're produced like magic," he said in his native Spanish. "But a piñata store is not only maintained with sales of piñatas but party supply rentals. We offered a service for bounce houses, tents, tables, chairs, piñatas, margarita and popcorn machines, balloons. It gave us enough to live," he said of the business he and his wife, Monica, started eight years ago. "We saw an increase in sales before it fell to the ground."

standing of minority enclaves. "Probably their livelihood was selling helium and stolen bicycles," French theorized in an interview with CultureMap. "They weren't making a living selling piñatas; they were selling something else. I don't want to speculate what that is. That's just my opinion, though."

But even as an outsider, French would've come to learn that such businesses are part and parcel of the Latino fabric had he done his due diligence on his tenants' livelihood. He would've learned that piñatas have a rich history dating to 14th century Spain where they were used primarily during the Lenten season. He would've learned how piñatas were later introduced into Mexico in the 16th century, and still remain popular in mostly Hispanic households for use at children's birthdays, quinceañeras marking a young woman's coming of age at turning 15, or during Las Posadas, a nine-day celebration running December 16-24.

But if such research were too much to handle, French could've resorted to Entrepreneur.com, which lists a piñata business as one of its lucrative start-up

LACK OF OVERSIGHT

In identifying the gentrification wave, Bo McCarver was indirectly ahead of the curve. After spearheading fights against eastward annexation by UT in the Eighties, he helped create a nonprofit solely for the purpose of buying neighborhood homes and preserving them as affordable housing as a shield against commercial encroachment. Block by block, his nonprofit Blackland Community Development Corp. purchased at least one home - creating a homestead patchwork that served to complicate any future efforts by developers to buy entire swaths of real estate for commercial development. Today, that prescient tactic is tangible with the collection of dozens of little homes designated as affordable housing.

"You spread your bets," McCarver said of the piecemeal approach the nonprofit undertook 25 years ago – a move he calls the poisoned watermelon strategy. "If someone is stealing watermelons, you don't want to poison the whole field. It makes it very difficult for a developer who wants to have the whole block. We have 49 units now, some duplexes. We also have a little enclave with six cottages in Robert Shaw Village."

But he conceded this approach would be difficult to replicate today, given the inflated property values.

Delgado sees a similar buying pattern in the East Cesar Chavez neighborhood, but with a different aim. Instead of preserving homes as affordable housing, residential properties are increasingly being purchased by outside investors only to be torn down and converted into short-term rentals for out-oftown visitors, she said. The increased abundance of STRs in the neighborhoods' midst illustrates how Austin's music scene, and its attendant festivals, have actually helped spur gentrification in established neighborhoods.

"They're demolishing our homes and building two-story McMansions and turning them into short-term rentals," she said. "At least 10 homes have been demolished in the past month, and, so far, 51 have been demolished," she added, noting the most recent pair of felled homes were along Canterbury Street. While decrying the process, she also wonders why the city hasn't made any overtures in exerting control through historical preservation – particularly given the neighborhood's roots in municipally sanctioned segregation of minorities.

City officials say the cottage industry centered on development of STRs is difficult to regulate, with 1,200 such projects spread out throughout the city and just 65 code compliance officers to ensure the rules to develop them are being followed. Last year alone, the city had 19,000 complaints from residents related to STRs in their midst, said public information and marketing manager Candice Cooper.

"Within probably the last six months or so, we're starting to see our STR properties that are operating starting to take on a different form, if you will," Cooper said. And that form is not often in the best interests of established neighborhoods and runs contrary to the spirit of the STR experience.

F&F Ventures emerges yet again, as a case study of an unchecked STR cottage industry. A year or so before buying the property where Jumpolin once stood, along with an adjacent property at 95 Navasota, the would-be real estate tycoons also bought three small homes in the same neighborhood, which are now listed on Airbnb as STRs, and were heavily promoted during this year's SXSW. A pair of those homes are near where Jumpolin once stood: one at 93 Navasota directly behind the demolished site, and another at 206 San Marcos St.

After the *Chronicle* alerted city officials to the drastic transformation of those homes into STRs, they began investigating F&F Ventures' practices in that realm as well. "You, through your email to us on the San Marcos property, actually prompted us to open up a case," Cooper said. "Because of your sending information to us, we're opening a new case and starting to open a second."

The San Marcos Street property – somehow converted from its original 2-bedroom, 1-bath CONTINUED ON **P.26**

configuration into the 7-bedroom, 3-bath setup advertised on Airbnb – was particularly concerning, Cooper said. After the *Chronicle*'s inquiry, city staffers read the Airbnb descriptions for themselves – not a traditional practice for them, she acknowledged – and learned each partition had its own lock, which only heightened their concerns.

"We have city codes and ordinances that the City Council has passed, and we have a responsibility to make sure residents are safe," Cooper said. "That's the big picture; that's the main goal. We want to maintain Austin as a livable city but also make sure residents are safe."

Senior public information specialist Jacqueline Ballone later confirmed that the city is also looking into possible violations at F&F Ventures' property at 93 Navasota, where an Airstream trailer was parked as further STR housing, in apparent violation of city rules. "Our neighborhood team and our STR enforcement team is working together to make sure this property comes into compliance," Ballone wrote in an April 2 update via email in reference to the San Marcos property. "We have discovered a number of violations at the property, one being for Work Without Permit, the other for Over Occupancy."

F&F Ventures listed its STR room rates during the recent SXSW, asking as much as \$1,800 to rent out an entire structure. Among past complaints listed by tenants staying in the houses were ongoing construction, no hot water, dirty sheets, cramped quarters, no window covering, and a shared bathroom for up to eight people.

TURNING BACK THE TIDE

District 3 Council Member Pio Renteria acknowledged the growing presence of STRs in a landscape that once was a largely Latino enclave comprising established homes. He conceded he, too, is an STR operator, converting one of two houses he owns with his wife to accommodate shortterm rental guests. But unlike commercial STR operators, his is a Type 1 STR, granted a homestead exemption requiring that its owners live on-site at least 51% of the time. He and his wife are in compliance, given they now live in a converted garage apartment behind the property, which is located across from Martin Middle School. It's the Type 2 STR variety he labels as being run by "absentee owners" that's become a city scourge, he suggested.

"I saw that coming," he said of gentrification that prompted him to diversify his real estate holdings as an alternative stream of income. "So what I did was get a loan and

buy a secondary unit because we were going to need some kind of revenue because taxes were starting to increase by the thousands. We rented it out as a SXSW vacation rental and made \$3,000 on it, and now I had some kind of extra revenue."

Like other Eastside residents, the Council member and his family also have been touched by gentrification. Two years ago, his son sold his own house on Cesar Chavez - which had increased in value from \$165,000 when he first bought it to \$375,000 when he sold - to find a bigger replacement to house his growing family. He opted to move to the city's southwest side, where he bought a home for \$214,000, Renteria said. Those fluctuating values

illustrate the demand for housing on the suddenly trendy Eastside, he noted. How times have changed: "Fifteen years ago, you couldn't even get a pizza delivered in that neighborhood," he observed.

Sometimes, Eastside residents feel the city itself has a bias toward developers' interests rather than theirs. The Jumpolin case to them exemplifies this bias, given that no steps were taken to ensure the business was vacant. In the city's protocol for demolition permits, making sure tenants have been properly notified of imminent demolition or eviction is not part of the process. "There's nothing in our applications that says this building is occupied," conceded historic preservation officer Steve Sadowsky. "That's the responsibility of the person applying for the demolition permit. I think that's a policy decision, and that's not mine to make."

The city's main area of focus as it relates to demolition permits is to ensure the property about to be demolished has no historical value. But even here, some Eastsiders wonder why greater effort wasn't made to

prevent the demolition, given the building's early, circa-1936 manifestation as a Phillips 66 gas station that helped form part of the community's early fabric.

Given gentrification's seemingly inexorable advance, residents wonder if anything can be done to stop it, or at least to mitigate its most negative side effects. McCarver has suggested persuading some people (should they have no other heirs) to will their homesteads to a preservation-minded nonprofit, ensuring that even after death a piece of their neighborhood's history might survive. State Rep. Eddie Rodriguez suggests that an effort to freeze property rates for longtime residents could, in theory, become state legislation.

But the former prescription would, by its nature, have only limited application. The latter would require a constitutional amendment, and potentially mean broad revision of the residential property tax system – both formidable tasks. Instead, Rodriguez is hoping to reignite an idea he first espoused in 2005, centered on using Tax Increment Financing to create more

affordable housing amidst rising property rates.

City Council approved such an ordinance in 2008, enabling the first tax increment reinvestment zone East Austin's Homestead Preservation District. It would utilize TIFs, land trusts, and land banks to create an affordable housing buffer against gentrification. But the executing details, in particular of the TIF districts, have never been implemented, even as Eastside property values continue to climb. (Land trusts or land banks work by holding the land in trust. meaning the homeowner's cost is confined to the housing itself; TIFs reinvest incremental gains in property taxes into the defined

district, directly for affordable units or other improvements.)

Renteria said he will reintroduce the idea during the next meeting of the Housing and Community Development Committee he heads, with hopes of city action to implement the measure. Rodriguez remains hopeful, but laments the time lost since the idea was first proposed, amid the continually changing landscape of the Eastside where he lives – four blocks from the former Jumpolin site. "I think it's [the Preservation District] always been a good idea, but the TIF component has never happened," he said. "Ten years later, [the city is] still debating it."

Next month marks the 16th anniversary of the East Cesar Chavez Neighborhood Plan's adoption by City Council. Its summary paints a neighborhood picture palpably celebrating the cultural richness of the working-class Latino enclave: "The Neighborhood wants to remain a place where people sit on their front porches and wave to their neighbors or lend a helping hand, and where working people, the elderly and young families can afford to live. It hopes to be a neighborhood that flourishes and supports all types of people, from artists to day laborers, from the elderly to newborns."

But that was then. Since its May 13, 1999 adoption, the idealism of that master plan seems increasingly anachronistic, a curious relic of days gone by. The gentrification wave is just too powerful, the prevailing market forces entirely too strong.

SHORT-TERM RENTALS: THE BASICS

Among the issues raised in the gentrification debate is that of "short-term rentals," or in the lexicon of the city's Code Department, "Vacation Rentals." Under the city's current vacation rental licensing law, there are three types of STRs which require city operating licenses:

- Type 1: Owner-occupied (an owner's principal residence, rented in part or temporarily)
- Type 2: Non-owner occupied, single-family or duplex (entirely rented)


• Type 3: Non-owner occupied, multi-family (e.g., apartment or condo) Of the three types, the Type 2 rentals have caused the most controversy, because it is feared they both diminish neighborhood family housing stock and drive up real estate prices – especially in central city neighborhoods. For that reason, when City Council created the licensing program, it also installed a cap on Type 2 rentals: For each census tract, only 3% of the single-family or two-family detached residential units can be licensed for Type 2 STRs.

As of this month, the Code Department currently lists just seven census tracts as having reached the licensing cap; six are south of Lady Bird Lake (Travis Heights to Zilker). Several other Downtown tracts are above 50%, and two of those are in Central East (along Seventh Street from I-35, and below East Cesar Chavez, with 47 licenses issued in those two tracts, and

only two available. (Other near Eastside census tracts are at 53% of available licenses, or less.)

Code Department spokeswoman Jacqueline Ballone says the current licenses can fluctuate (generally according to major event schedules), and because the ordinance allows a "trial period" (enabling owners to "test the market" by advertising, before deciding to register with the city), it can be difficult to determine precisely how many STRs are available at any given time. Enforcement can also be uneven because of limited city staffing – for example, in the cases discussed in "Eastward Expansion," above, the F&F Ventures STRs were in fact licensed, but staff learned only from their online advertising (when alerted by the *Chronicle*) that the configurations and capacities of the units had been altered, triggering potential code violations. Similarly, the precise extent of "underground" or unlicensed STRs remains largely unconfirmed; Code does monitor online advertising, and can act on neighborhood complaints of unlicensed STRs.

Since the STR ordinance is itself still in development, city staff intends to return to Council sometime this year with recommendations for revision, concerning enforcement, staffing, and other provisions. When those recommendations will be ready for Council review is yet to be determined. – *Michael King*

Update: According to the mayor of Rio de Janeiro, it appears that some of the 2016 Summer Olympics aquatic events will take place among floating household trash and raw sewage in Guanabara Bay (although Mayor Eduardo Paes noted to the Associated Press in March that the events are scheduled for the "cleanest part" of the bay). To acquire the games, organizers had promised a massive cleanup, but now, with 500 days to go, Paes conceded that the goals will not be met and that, indeed, infrastructure improvements still have not halted the sewage flow into the bay.

Wait, What?

An unarmed man, suspected of no crime, who three years ago was shot 16 times by police while lying in his bed, told a Seattle Times reporter in March that he bears no ill will for the cops who shot him. Said Dustin Theoharis, now 32, "Sometimes [police] make mistakes." Theoharis was napping in a friend's house in Puyallup, Wash., when police arrived to arrest the friend's son, and when Theoharis reached for his ID, one officer imagined a gun, and the two officers opened fire, hitting Theoharis in the jaw, both upper arms, both lower arms, wrist, hand, shoulder, abdomen, and both legs. He spent months in a hospital and skilled nursing facility and today is largely immobile and unable to work. (He "won" legal settlements totaling \$5.5 million, but one-third went to lawyers, and much of the rest has paid medical bills.)

Can't Possibly Be True

Despite the skepticism of a few tech writers, the Internet pornography super-site Pornhub insists that it is developing a wristband that stores energy (enough to power a cell phone) that can be generated by the "up and down" motion of masturbation. Pornhub announced in February that it will soon begin recruiting human testers for its Wankband.

Compelling Explanations

According to the 17-year-old bicyclist who was broadsided by a motorist at rush hour in Sheffield, England, on March 6, a woman, at

first, alighted from the car to help. However, upon seeing the extent of the cyclist's injuries, she apologized and walked away, telling the sprawled-out victim that her children were in the car and would be "scared" to see all that blood – and so she would drive them on to school. (Witnesses provided a description of the vehicle, but the hit-and-run driver is still at large.)

Trying to stake out a position on the Paris murders of the staff of *Charlie Hebdo* magazine, Pope Francis in January told an audience during his Philippines tour that freedom of speech is important, but that there are limits. "If my good friend Dr. [Alberto] Gasbarri [who organized the pope's visit and was standing at his side] says a curse word against my mother," Francis said, "he can expect a punch." He then "threw" a mock "punch" toward Gasbarri. (The Vatican press office was later moved to clarify that violence in God's name can never be justified.)

Cultural Diversity

Super-Protective Parenting: Standardized placement exams are typically far more determinative of student success in Asian countries than the United States, and in March in some testing centers in India's Bihar state, "traditional" rampant cheating became grotesque. Dozens of parents were seen climbing outside walls of one center (to pass answers and notes to the students), reminiscent of movie depictions of Santa Anna's army scaling the walls of the Alamo. The weeklong secondary school exams, testing 1.4 million students, had early-on seen 400plus students expelled, nine bags of cheat sheets confiscated, and at least seven parents arrested. However, officials admitted that their security forces were overmatched by parents desperate to assist their children.

Awesome!

Chicago's WGN-TV was forced to apologize in March for a misjudgment in booking its morning show after an unconventional "circus" performer, in a live-television publicity segment, took a power saw to a metal box affixed to her crotch. "Dancer" Shana Vaughan-Gabor, of the Cirque de la Femme, created a dazzling shower of sparks, provoking the male host to first demand that the camera cut away, but then admitting, "I've been waiting my whole life to meet a woman like this." In the follow-up segment, a group of children who had witnessed the scene used descriptions like "creepy" and "stinky," but Vaughan-Gabor later urged the station to "save the children from 'boring' [entertainment]."

The Litigious Society

In March, the Administrative Office of the Courts revealed a slight increase in federal litigation in 2014, but a much larger increase in prisoner lawsuits. Leading the upturn was Dale Maisano, 63, serving 15 years for aggravated assault, who last year alone filed 3,613 cases concerning his Florence, Ariz., facility. Counting previous prison stints, Maisano has filed 6,076 complaints against various officials and prison system health care providers. (In a 2014 USA Today report, Maisano volunteered that he himself "could use some mental health help.")

Unclear on the Concept

In March, the investment bank Credit Suisse Group AG agreed to pay \$16.25 million to settle a client's charges that Credit Suisse gave faulty investment advice on two acquisitions by Freeport-McMoRan (one of the world's largest producers of copper and gold). Actually, according to a *Wall Street Journal* report, Freeport will receive only \$10 million in cash. The remaining amount it agreed to accept, to make up for Credit Suisse's faulty advice, is \$6.25 million worth of future investment advice.

Is This a Great Country or What?

Ion Productions of Cincinnati is eager to sell "the world's first commercially available hand-held flamethrower" – the XM42, which could shoot 25-foot flames and costs between \$700 and \$800. Ion announced in March that it was seeking additional funding, touting the device's uses ("killing insects," "eliminating weeds between pavement cracks," "melting snow," "entertaining friends") and assuring potential buyers that portable flamethrowers are less regulated than handguns. (Only California and Maryland legislators, and a few city or county officials, appear to be on top of the issue of amateur flamethrowing.)



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Symphony No. I-35 FINALLY, A TRAFFIC JAM WE CAN ENJOY, THANKS TO COMPOSER STEVE PARKER by Natalie Zeldin

Nobody likes sitting in bad traffic. The exasperating stillness, the exhaust fumes, the expletives screamed at you (and by you). But while the rest of us have been stuck under that particular black cloud, composer Steve Parker has been molding the silver lining. The result is *Traffic Jam*, a punny name for the eccentric but thoughtful musical offering being presented at the Blue Starlite Drive-In on Saturday as part of the Fusebox Festival.

Traffic Jam is scored for a few conventional instruments, but the majority of it will be performed with repurposed transportation equipment: bikes as percussion instruments, pedicabs as dancers, even a golf cart outfitted with piano parts. The bumper-to-bumper lineup includes line upon line percussion, sound artist Mark McCoin, composers Ethan Greene and Travis Weller, and a band of community participants performing a cathartic chorus on their car horns.

In the fury of an I-35 bottleneck, drivers understandably find it challenging to appreciate the sheer magnitude of traffic sound. The honks, screeches, and hums are our shared language on the road – the music of our everyday transportation experience. The program aims to help us reflect, celebrate, and, yes, grieve our collective commutes.

In the spirit of rush hour, I spoke with Parker about his project on a Friday at 5pm. Austin Chronicle: So where did this idea come from?

Steve Parker: I'm always trying to think of projects that have some sort of relevance beyond just being concert music. One issue on everyone's mind is traffic and their frustration with it

I'm also interested in exploring unused spaces that have a high incidence of activity at some times but are then completely unutilized at others. I've been interested in parking lots and garages in Austin because they seem to hold promise. So this is an outgrowth of those two things: frustration with traffic and activating underutilized spaces. AC: The concert will include music written by students at Austin Soundwaves, a local organization that provides music education to underserved students. What was your experience mentoring this project?

SP: I really enjoy working with them. It is a great organization, with a great structure and administration. Last year, I worked with the students on an instrument-building project. This year, for this program, it is more of a composition project. We had weekly projects using Audacity and Ableton Live (sound manipulation and looping softwares) where we would record samples of automo-

biles and layer sounds. Now we are collaborating with composer Ethan Greene to tie things together.

AC: The concert will be at the Blue Starlite Drive-In, which is Austin's only drive-in movie theatre. How did you choose this venue? SP: Well, we looked at a few other places first - empty garages and parking lots - but surrounding noise was a big factor. The Blue Starlite is a real cool place. It's isolated and enormous. It almost feels like being in West Texas because it is on a plateau and nothing crowds your line of vision. It seemed like a good place to be performing.

AC: The final piece uses community participants' car horns. What inspired you to write for the car as an instrument?

SP: There is definitely precedence for using car horns as instruments. The original inspiration for this piece, though, was Volumina by György Ligeti. The piece is written for the organ and has a lot of densities over the range of this monstrous instrument. I always thought about how that would be on car horns. Being a trombonist, I've always been interested in the breath and volume of horns, particularly large horns: trucks, large barges, and steamboats. In terms of car horns, I think everyone will look forward to leaning on their horns and making a lot of noise. AC: So how are you writing this piece? SP: Well, there's not that much you can do with a car horn because there's not a lot of variety in pitch content. So the main variety comes from the space, density, and intervals. If you tap it really lightly, you get virtually no pitch, just the "articulation" of the horn. There is some oscillation in the tone when you hold it down for a while. As people sign up, they enter information about their car, and I can usually find the sound of its horn on YouTube. People have also been emailing me recordings of their car horns with their phones. Everyone will have a unique part in the form of instructions to do certain things with the car horn. The instructions are timed according to a synchronized stopwatch, which we'll practice in the hourlong rehearsal before the concert.



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

hen All the Way opened at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival in July 2012, the play's future was anybody's guess. Would any theatre besides this immense repertory company be willing to mount a political drama requiring 17 actors and running nearly three hours? Was there even a remote chance that such a show could have commercial prospects? No one knew. The only thing about All the Way's life after OSF that seemed certain indeed, seemed downright inevitable - was that it would be produced in Austin. After all, the playwright, Pulitzer Prize winner Robert Schenkkan, grew up here and graduated from the University of Texas. Zach Theatre Artistic Director Dave Steakley was among those who saw the play early on and felt strongly that it belonged at his theatre. And, of course, the play's protagonist not only has deep roots in Central Texas, he retains a towering, even mythic presence in this city four decades after his death. That would be Lyndon Baines Johnson, 36th President of the United States. How could this play about his first year in the White House *not* be staged on LBJ's home turf?

This week, All the Way finally makes to the capital city, after a sold-out run at the American Repertory Theatre in Cambridge, Mass., and a box-office-busting Broadway engagement, both starring Bryan Cranston; and a run in rep with its sequel, The Great Society, at Seattle Repertory Theatre, where it was the highest-grossing production in company history. And it arrives with a pair of Tony Awards, two Drama Desk Awards, two Outer Critics Circle Awards, two Boston Theater Critics Association Awards, five Independent Reviewers of New England Awards, and the inaugural Edward M. Kennedy Prize for Drama Inspired by American History. That the play has garnered so much attention and acclaim might suggest initial concerns about its marketability were misplaced, but it's hard to imagine just any drama about the Johnson administration stirring up the frenzy this one has. Something singular's at work here.

Steakley, who's seen the play five times - once in Oregon, twice on Broadway, and twice in Seattle - felt it that first performance. "I was struck by the immediacy of the story," he says, "how vital and important Robert Schenkkan has made this play to the times in which we live. I felt like I was on the edge of my seat, even though I knew the outcomes. He's written it with a propulsion on the page which makes it work like a political thriller. I was overwhelmed by what LBJ was able to accomplish in a single year: the passage of the Civil Rights Act and laying the groundwork for the Voting Rights Act as well as the 60 education bills he passed and Great Society initiatives like the war on poverty, Medicare, Medicaid, national parks and environmental protections, the National Endowment for the Arts and Humanities, PBS, Head Start, and the list goes on and on. The very fine actors at Oregon Shakespeare Festival and Bill Rauch's inspired direction made it an experience that for me was equivalent with the thrill of seeing George Wolfe's produc-

tion of *Angels in America*: an absolutely unforgettable theatre event that continues to stick with you and grow in its impact."

If anyone has a bead on LBJ's impact on the country and culture, it's Mark Updegrove, director of the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library and Museum, and author of Indomitable Will: LBJ in the Presidency and Destiny of Democracy: The Civil Rights Summit at the LBJ Presidential Library (the latter just published by the Briscoe Center for American History). He considers the keen interest and powerful response to this drama about Johnson "a testament to the man and the times I view civil rights as the most important domestic movement of the 20th century, and I think we're finally getting an appreciation of how significant that movement was - what a different country the United States was a half-century ago and how important the leadership demonstrated by Martin Luther King and LBJ and others were in changing the story."

Updegrove admits to being far from a disinterested observer where *All the Way* is concerned, having met and befriended Schenkkan and Cranston when they visited the library for research. Then there's his relationship to the subject. "In some manner I live with LBJ every day," he says, so encountering the man onstage wasn't as revelatory as it could be for most. "I think for folks whose day jobs do not involve the very outsized personality of Lyndon Johnson, being with him for two or three hours in the theatre might be a more immersive experience."

The historian chalks his measured reaction up to an occupational hazard: "I wrote an article for *Politico* after *Selma* came out

that was sort of the opening salvo in the whole debate over that film, and the first paragraph talks about the fact that when you're a historian you have to hold back your pedantic urges and allow the story to wash over you. And the best you can hope for is that the playwright or screenwriter and director have captured the essence of the story and the individuals around it. If they do that, then as far as I'm concerned, they've succeeded. Of course, they're going to use creative license in order to serve their narrative. You expect that. But by that standard, Robert did a good job of capturing the different challenges that LBJ faced from the beginning of his presidency, his championing of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and his challenges in winning the presidency in his own right the same year. I appreciated Robert's sense of history and his grasp of the facts of the administration. And he didn't use a great deal of creative license, as others might be tempted to when looking at a story as Shakespearean as the story of Lyndon Johnson. I don't know if it's LBJ meets King Lear or King Lear meets LBJ, but it's somewhere in between. Robert does a good job of capturing LBJ - who is a very difficult man to capture because he had so many different facets. Those who were around him, everyone saw a different man in many respects."

As Steakley has been working on All the Way's Texas premiere, he's become quite conscious of Johnson's many personalities, echoing Updegrove that "everyone has a different perception of who Johnson was because he was a master of transformation based on whomever he was dealing with." Steve Vinovich, who was Cranston's understudy but is only now getting to step into Lyndon's boots, was told by former Johnson aide Bill Moyers that "LBJ was 13 of the most interesting people he ever met." That makes Johnson "a remarkable character to play," says Steakley. "We hope we've captured the essence of the man through all of the interviews and research and footage and recordings we have been poring over for months. When Steve and I visited with various associates who knew LBJ very well, like Larry Temple [special counsel to LBJ during his presidency] and Harry Middleton [staff assistant, speechwriter, and the first director of the LBJ Library], we found their accounts of what he was like privately, as well as from day to day in the White House, counters much of what's been written about him and made for an even more complex portrait that changed the character that Steve and I are seeking to build onstage.

"There were times in the rehearsal process when we were trying to implement some of these characteristics, and some were successful and some had to be abandoned because they were choices that did not support what Robert Schenkkan wrote. Robert has been very clear that this is a play and not a documentary, so theatrical license has been employed to tell the story and relate private conversations that aren't on record. We have to tell the story he has written and do our best to inform it with everything we have learned about LBJ."

Steakley is also keenly aware that as they do, they'll be watched by many people who knew LBJ and Lady Bird personally, a prospect that's "incredibly intimidating and very exciting at the same time." He adds, "I think all of us who are native Texans are sensitized to portrayals of Texans that lack authenticity and are used to seeing plays and movies that get it wrong. I feel a tremendous amount of responsibility around this issue. I've been down this path of putting real-life people who are well-known onstage before, and it is tricky because you are dealing with people's beloved personal memories. And that is also the joy of a play like this, because Central Texans will come to this play with tremendous investment in what is portrayed and how it is realized. It is a subject we care about and that always makes for an exciting night in the theatre.

"Jack Willis, who premiered the play at OSF, and Bryan Cranston, who performed the role on Broadway, were both incredible as LBJ, and yet their interpretations were very, very different. Steve is very different from either of them. I agonized over this casting for months, but as I said to Robert, Steve is absolutely the right actor to do this play in Austin, and I can't imagine anyone better suited to bring LBJ to life for our highly attuned audience. It is a privilege and an honor to get to tell a story we are so passionate about, and I look forward to all of the conversations this play will open."

For the Zach artistic director, those conversations always come back to civil rights and the immediacy in All the Way. "As I've spent time with the play, I am in awe that a 30-year-old black preacher and a president from a very modest beginning could have the savvy, and strategy, and cojones to make that happen, amidst the coordination of an infinite number of issues and personalities within both sides of the movement.

"There is a scene depicting the funeral of James Chaney, the young African-American civil rights worker who was murdered during Freedom Summer by the Ku Klux Klan in Mississippi. Reverend King leads the service, and he's interrupted by David Dennis, a young civil rights worker who had lent his station wagon to Andrew Goodman, Michael Schwerner, and Chaney the day they disappeared. Feeling the full weight of his grief, Dennis gives a moving and powerful, spontaneous speech to the assembled congregation, and Delante Keys, who is new to Austin, delivers it in a way that is urgent, heartbreaking, and unforgettable. The speech sounds like it was written today because it is exactly what we are hearing our African-American friends express now in the Black Lives Matter movement. It never fails to choke me up. It is a call to action for all of us to get this resolved once and for all for our friends and neighbors. It's abhorrent that Dennis' words would still have resonance more than 50 years later. We have got to do better as a nation."



The hero of Jacob's Ladder wrestles with ethical issues while working for FDR in Theatre en Bloc's latest

Many of us, regardless of religious affiliation, are familiar with the biblical Jacob and his vision of a ladder, a metaphor for his ascension to heaven. Theatre en Bloc is currently offering a production of a new work by the same name, but the Jacob in focus here climbs a different ladder, this time in the workforce, having just

begun a job as a staffer in FDR's White House. Pressures of work, home life, and a raging war bubble up, causing our protagonist to wrestle with morality and eventually to do his own part to incite change.

Using a familial connection to secure himself a spot in the office of the most powerful man in the world, Jacob (Zach Kleinsmith) is a nervous yet ambitious recent Harvard graduate, a young Jewish man passionate about his family and his convictions, but unsure how to thrive in his new position. Kleinsmith delivers a solid performance, both guirky and confident when called for. Sharing his office is FDR's firecracker secretary, Patsy (a biting Johanna Whitmore), who does

little to help him gain his footing and has little patience for his optimism and inexperience. Through his close proximity to the president, Jacob eventually learns of plans to bomb the

Nazi concentration camps, JACOB'S LADDER an issue that is to him both ethical and deeply personal, as a relative of his is currently imprisoned at one such camp.

When not ferrying documents back and forth, Jacob

enjoys time with his charming wife, Sara, played by Theatre en Bloc's own Jenny Lavery. Though deeply in love with her husband, Sara has her own ambitions apart from her family, and Lavery portrays the affable but driven young woman with aplomb. A foil to Sara's modern independence is Jacob's mother, Esther, an Eastern European who escaped her tumultuous past, played by the



formidable Babs George. At times this role skirts the line of stereotype, but George's superb talent helps mask these deficiencies in the script, producing a character who feels well-rounded and believable.

Any problems I have with this production are rooted in the script, written by Dennis Bailey and David Mixner. Much of the dialogue feels a bit stilted and unnatural, a hurdle that this talented group of actors works to overcome. There are also some inconsistencies peppered throughout -Jacob, referred to as "the smartest man in the room," is unable to remember Hamlet's name, for one. Furthermore, I find it difficult to believe that Jacob would be allowed to speak to the president about highly confidential information that he had no business knowing in the first place, though it

does make for a lovely moment at the end of the play.

Under Derek Kolluri's smart direction, Theatre en Bloc overcomes these minor roadblocks and once more delivers highcaliber theatre. The visuals are gorgeous, from Leslie Turner's smooth, abstract scenic design to Steven Shirey's soft, blue-toned lighting. Blake Addyson's big band sound design helps take us back in time, as do Jenny Hanna-Chambers' lovely costumes. One of my favorite decisions, though, is the choice to perform in the Boyd Vance Theatre at the George Washington Carver Museum, an underutilized space in our theatre community. The skilled creative team at Theatre en Bloc consistently works to bring us new works in new ways, and Jacob's Ladder is a step up in the right direction.





MIRÓ QUARTET Bates Recital Hall, 2406 Robert Dedman April 3

Safe terrain is not where one expects to travel with the Miró Quartet. In the dozen vears that it's been quartet-in-residence at the University of Texas, this intrepid foursome has consistently taken routes that offer spectacular rewards but are not without risk. So last Friday evening, it was hardly a surprise to find myself with the ensemble on the side of a mountain, climbing to the summit on a winding road rife with treacherous switchbacks. At least that's how it felt journeying through Schubert's String Quartet No. 15 in G major, a work that revels in extremes. One moment the music is all anxious and fretful, the strings sawing away in jittery apprehension, the next it's settled into a sedate amble, grounded by long, low tones from the cello. Then no sooner has the score calmed down than it works itself into another lather, all four bows fluttering like hummingbird heartbeats and signaling a skittish dread. So it went for the better part of an hour Friday, back and forth and back and forth between passages of easy lyricism and edgy unease, serene beauty and feverish tension – the musical equivalent of bipolar mood swings. To mine the intensity of feeling embedded in any one of the passages requires exceedingly expressive musicians, but to handle the constant shifting between emotional extremes - not to mention its coordination among four players - demands artists of uncommon skill and versatility. That's what gives String Quartet 15 the feel of racing along a cliff's edge, where a wrong move on any of those sharp curves could end in a precipitous drop.

But taking that precarious ride with the Miró was like being inside a perfectly tuned Porsche with an expert hand at the wheel: You barreled along with nary a bump, those hairpin turns handled so smoothly that you never felt the slightest whiplash from the abrupt changes of direction. And the quartet not only negotiated Schubert's wildly disparate musical and emotional states with power and passion, they clearly relished doing so, as was evident in a moment when violin-

ists Daniel Ching and William Fedkenheuer exchanged looks of mock surprise as the music suddenly changed course; as much as the work was demanding of them, the playfulness in their expressions revealed the joy they felt. And that joy transferred to the crowd, where it mingled with the amazement we felt at the command that Fedkenheuer, Ching, violist John Largess, and cellist Joshua Gindele had of this monumental material.

By comparison, the concert's second work seemed rather straightforward. That's not to say that Arnold Schöenberg's Verklärte Nacht (Transfigured Night) is without deep feeling or its own potent emotional shifts. But this early composition (before Schöenberg's experiments with atonality and the 12-tone system) follows the structure of the Richard Dehmel poem that inspired it: On a moonlit walk with her lover, a woman confesses that she's pregnant and he is not the father, to which he responds with words of comfort and acceptance, and an embrace. So the music moves in a linear fashion from evocations of despair and guilt to expressions of solace and then to a sense of hope. The depth of feeling in each section had the lush, saturated colors of late Romanticism, with Schöenberg taking his cues from both Brahms and Wagner. It gave the Miró another opportunity to elicit strong emotions (and demonstrate its facility at doing so), but what made this piece special was the presence of two guest artists from Rice University: violist James Dunham and cellist Norman Fischer. The integration of these men into this fixed ensemble paid tribute to both the flexibility and collaborative spirit of all these musicians and the continuity in their craft - the knowledge and virtuosity passed from generation to generation. When the piece reached its open-hearted resolution, it seemed to belong to more than the poem's two characters. It embraced everyone on that stage - and all the musicians who had taught them and all the musicians they would teach. It was a chord resonating across time, transfiguring much more than a single night. - Robert Faires





"WITNESS: ARTS AND CIVIL RIGHTS IN THE SIXTIES

Blanton Museum of Art, 200 E. MLK www.blantonmuseum.org Through May 10

With the deaths of Michael Brown and Eric Garner at the hands of policemen in Ferguson, Mo., and NYC, respectively, a movement overtook the country in 2014, centered around the hashtag #BlackLivesMatter. This unification came in the wake of the not guilty verdict for George Zimmerman, who killed black Florida teen Trayvon Martin only the year before. This convergence of black voices created a dynamic dialogue about not only the current state of race relations in America but also the history of black culture in the United States. Many voices were saddened and solemn, lamenting that while the Voting Rights Act of 1965 may be behind us, there is still so much work ahead to create a country of true equality.

GARCÍ The Blanton Museum of Art's "Witness: Art and Civil Rights in the ANOH. Sixties" takes a timely look at art N N from that pivotal moment in American history. Organized by the Brooklyn AFL Museum in New York, "Witness" 2 IN showcases painting, sculpture, and 5 photography (among other mediums) ES < that helped capture the legacy and creative expression of these early freedom fighters. In Barkley Hendricks' Lawdy Mama, a black woman with a beautiful soft brown afro is posed against a gold leaf background. It's a quiet portrait of vulnerability in a historical climate that focused so intensely on violence. Likewise, the show's organization

seeks to provide a nuanced look at the Civil Rights Movement by homing in on eight sections: Integrate/Educate, American Nightmare, Presenting Evidence, Politicizing Pop, Black Is Beautiful, Sisterhood, Global Liberation, and Beloved Community.

Though "Witness" weaves a strong story of individuals and community in flux as they fight for civil rights, the exhibition's core is Jack Whitten's Birmingham 1964, a stark,

aggressive, and somber piece that communicates the harsh reality of progress birthed from violence.

"Witness" emphasizes the need for more complex, multidimensional accounts from the country's civil rights era. In its presentation of art as an expression of social justice, the exhibition goes above and beyond to cement the reputations of the artists who documented their changing world - the question is whether audiences who have culturally compartmentalized those voices over the past 50 years will be open to experiencing them in all their multitudes now. - Caitlin Greenwood



The Matt Cook Wildlife Viewing Platform

above the prairie west of Houston gives a bird's eye view of the birds. From the second-story viewing deck, the entire Warren Lake comes into view.

It's a peaceful spot high above the flat plain with the wind tugging at your cap. From this vantage point, the glassy surface of the lake and the thick brush surrounding it is a busy place.

The wildlife viewing area is one of four of the Katy Prairie Conservancy's preserves open to the public. The nonprofit land trust controls 14 greens-paces covering more than 13,000 acres, most of it the V created by I-10 and U.S. 290.

Generations ago, the land west of Houston was covered in coastal grassland. Less than 1% of the once expansive prairie remains in scattered remnants. What survives is critical habitat for resident and migratory wildlife.

Named for a young outdoorsman whose family has deep roots in the area, the platform opened in 2010. A picturesque location, Warren Lake is one of the premiere wildlife and birding locations on the coast. Not only can you see shore birds, but eagles, osprey, and other large birds soar over the lake.

Matt Cook Wildlife Viewing Platform is only about 3.5 miles south of U.S. 290 at the Hegar Road exit in Hockley, but can also be accessed from I-10 from the Mason Road exit near Katy.



On both of the next two weekends, menu specials at Fino will preview some of the dishes from Cantine, the Foxes' eagerly awaited new eatery set to open in the Lamar Union development later this spring, and then paella and sangria will be half-off on Tue., April 14, Say goodbye to Fino in style by attending the final brunch on Sun., April 19, when they'll be raising money for the Sustainable Food Center. BARBECUE SMOKE CLEARS. Now that the proposed barbecue smoke ordinance has been discussed before the City Council, it's clear the problems that generated the original complaints are related to very specific situations at Terry Black's Barbecue (1003 Barton Springs Rd.) and la Barbecue (902 E. Cesar Chavez). Multiple speakers, including barbecue restaurant owners and some City Council persons, warned against crafting a one-size-fits-all city smoke ordinance that could have an adverse effect on long-established neighborhood barbecue restaurants that have never generated complaints. Attorney Guy Watts, who is providing pro bono representation to his Daniel Drive neighbors in their quest to solve the ongoing smoke problems with the owners of Terry Black's, advocates a city-sponsored mediation process to address the specific details of individual grievances rather than a blanket smoke ordinance. Several longtime residents on the bluff directly above the restaurant have legitimate complaints about the emissions from the five smokers that are going 22 hours a day, seven days a week, at the restaurant that opened there last year. It's a very individual problem directly related to the physical geography of the situation and the daily need for fires. Although the owners of Terry Black's refused to discuss the smoke issue with us, LeAnn Mueller and John Lewis of la Barbecue have told us they intend to move their smokers to another position on the GoodLife Food Park lot on Mon., April 13. They hope the different position will ameliorate the smoke complaints of their Second Street neighbor, Bruce Hughes, until they can move their entire operation to a brick-and-mortar location at 1722 S. Congress with rooftop smokers later this year. Meanwhile, the proposed city ordinance will be studied and return to the Council agenda in late July.

THE TORRES FAMILY opened **Mi Madre's** (2201 Manor Rd.) 25 years ago, but they had no notion of being one of the anchor tenants of an emerging restaurant row or pioneering the positive transformation of a neighborhood. They simply wanted to share their family recipes for tacos and salsa, and their delicious food has earned them a fiercely loyal clientele. They're hosting a "Customer Appreciation Fiesta" on their back parking lot this weekend with a live music lineup, mini piñatas, taco and salsa eating contests, and a performance by Del Valle's **Ballet Folklórico**. Sat., April 11, 1-8pm-ish.



Identity Crisis

416 BAR & GRILLE SEARCHES FOR AN AUDIENCE

Every so often a film finds an audience despite itself. We celebrate the stilted performances, the period details, the stray boom mic in the shot. And we give that pleasure a word and an aesthetic, "camp," perhaps to keep our distance. If we were to plot out our own sci-fi epic, it would certainly be better than the mess before us. There's false comfort in every frame.

But the truth is that *Troll 2* or *The Room* or *Coven* are exactly the kinds of movies most of us would make were most of us graced with the right balance of delusion and passion to try in the first place. And 416 Bar & Grille is the kind of restaurant that most of us would open. Only a few things

about the restaurant could be called successful, but I've still discussed 416 more than any of the current slate of dining hot spots. The restaurateurs haven't quite achieved the

dining tabula rasa they were going for, but they somehow have landed near charm. For lack of a better word, they serve *culinary* camp.

Take, for example, 416's deconstructed nachos (\$6). Deconstruction has for at least a decade wound up on lists of regrettable dining trends, but somehow never completely lost its appeal to a generation of chefs looking for a novel way to write paragraphs with a relatively limited vocabulary. At its best, the technique smartly evokes sense and memory, but it is more often merely a collection of components - the kind of thing a toddler would create if he insisted his vegetables could not touch on the plate. 416's falls in the latter camp - separating the stoner classic into a bowl of fried torti-Ila wedges and a separate plate housing four tiny stainless ramekins of sour cream, queso, pico, and salsa. Were Susan Sontag a food critic, she would eat it up.

That naive pretense runs throughout the menu. The braised pork sandwich (\$9) is served with "avocado mash." The oozing cheese steak (\$12) is "griddled," not grilled, and at least one salad is stacked. It reads like the food diary of a home cook brainwashed by episodes of *Chopped*. But neither member of the father/son ownership team is new to the business. According to the website bio, John Jurey pioneered San Francisco food truck culture before settling on a brickand-mortar in St. Augustine, Fla. Son Colin most recently worked at 24 Diner, which seems to at least partially inspire 416's "Americana Cuisine."

> But diverse as 24's menu may be, it makes sense. 416 almost mocks expectations. Like the ELM Group mainstay, 416 serves breakfast anytime. On weekdays, "anytime" means any time other than breakfast, as the restaurant

does not open until 4pm. 24's atmosphere gussies up the greasy spoon with booths and midcentury details. 416 throws you into the past too, but it's more like the apartment of the Memorex "blown away guy" – all gloss (you can still smell the paint) and gunmetal. Even the placemats are devoted to cold gray, a palette that does the food no favors. And 24's prices top out at a \$23.95 rib eye. 416 has one too, but it goes for \$30 (pardon, 30. – another affectation).

More importantly, many of 416's dishes seem just off. The flaky vodka crust on the chicken pot pie (\$18) was well executed, but the thinnish filling would perhaps be better appreciated by a Hungrier Man. There wasn't a bit of crisp in the fried chicken (\$15), a dish sorely needing seasoning. And the Parmesan drops (\$10), enticingly described on the menu as having prosciutto and white truffle glacé,



were vaguely cheesy shortbread cookies served on a rectangle of supermarket field greens interspersed with irregular ribbons of the meat. There was no trace of a glacé, and certainly no white truffle.

And yet, still there was considerable charm. The service staff were attentive and easygoing; there was a pride in the food that never quite matched up with the product. What did match up was the drink program, boasting innovative and balanced cocktails like the Holy Mole (\$9 - with rum, creme de banana, and mole bitters), the 512 Matador (\$9 - mezcal, jalapeño, and tamarind), and a basil gin rickey (\$9). Best was the Pear of Dice (\$10), a knockout combo of allspice, whiskey, pear, and maple. Both proved that a lot of care went into 416 Bar & Grille. Like the best camp, theirs is accidental. Unfortunately, there is no midnight movie circuit for restaurants. To survive in the increasingly cluttered Burnet Road dining corridor, they will need a new script altogether.

How a trailer becomes brick-and-mortar

When Wesley Hurt pioneered the food trailer business in the 1600 block of South Congress in the fall of 2007, he was an energetic young man with an entrepreneurial spirit, convinced he could cash in on the cupcake craze sweeping the West Coast. Hurt taught himself a few simple cake and frosting recipes and parked a shiny vintage Airstream trailer on the corner of a big, empty lot directly across from the busy SoCo strip. A rotating cupcake on top of the trailer attracted curious customers, and Hurt's business flourished. Eventually, a full complement of food trailers filled the lot, making the SoCo strip an even more inviting shopping and dining destination.

Within a couple of years, Hurt had secured a brick-andmortar location on Burnet Road where customers could pick up large custom orders and which has a commissary kitchen with a staff of actual trained bakers. The quality of his product improved and the cupcake business was good. When it became obvious that the long-delayed boutique hotel would finally be built on the South Congress block, Hurt's was the first trailer to move, securing another space just one block up the street to maintain the valuable SoCo connection. He continued his expansion with trailers in other strategic locations, such as the Four Corners area near Lake Travis and the high-profile Barton Springs Picnic.

After building Hey Cupcake! into one of Austin's most

recognizable trailer food brands, Hurt and business partner Matthew "Petey" Peterson sold 78% of the business to investment fund manager Frank Drew in 2014. Both men retain small percentages of the business, but Hurt has moved on to start another company while Peterson continues to work with Hey Cupcake! in social media marketing. Hey Cupcake! now employs about 50 people and had sales in seven figures in fiscal year 2014.

Any way you look at it, Hey Cupcake! is an Austin food trailer success story, but a lot of that success has to do with being in the right place at the right time. Austin in the mid-Aughts was in a real estate slump with several attractive central city properties awaiting development that was stalled for lack of funding. Inspired by emerging food trends in major coastal cities, a handful of scrappy

culinary entrepreneurs began trying the trailer business for themselves. Savvy landlords turned empty lots into food courts, some with more amenities than others. Austin's scene soon developed a national reputation with local brands such as Torchy's Tacos, East Side King, and Kebabalicious attracting customers and media attention.

However, for every success story, there are more trailers that have been only marginally solvent and an equal number that have closed. As even the most successful operator will tell you, the trailer food business is a tough one, defined by even more unpredictability than the restaurant business itself. Here's what it takes to start: various city permits; an innovative concept with an inviting menu; a truck with cooking facilities, or a trailer from which to serve food prepared at a commissary kitchen; a rental space with some parking or good foot traffic; and perhaps amenities such as covered tables and accessible bathrooms. Once the trailer/truck is operational, you're completely at the mercy of the elements – cold, heat, rain, wind, holidays, myriad special events, street closures, even the local allergy pollen count – all those things can and will impact your sales, regardless of how much the public loves your food.

There are local food trailer owners who've run that gauntlet and made a living, but the Austin landscape has changed dramatically in the past two years. The golden age of small investment start-ups has all but passed. Real estate development money is flowing again, which means fewer empty lots, and lots specially designed as food courts with parking and amenities can demand premium prices for space rentals. Trendy new restaurants open almost weekly, increasing competition for local dining dollars. The savviest local culinary entrepreneurs realized early on that the transition to brick-and-mortar outlets offered the opportunity to create a more sustainable business model. These two business owners took different paths to accomplish their ultimate brick-and-mortar dreams, but both are thriving and looking toward a bright future.

THE PEACHED TORTILLA

Eric Silverstein wasn't happy in the practice of law, yearning instead for work that was more entrepreneurial and had to do with food. In his search for investment capital for his first restaurant project, the biggest stumbling block was his lack of a verifiable track record of success in the food service industry. Inspired by well-documented success stories of Asian-American chefs David Chang and Roy Choi, Silverstein opted

Merging the culinary influences of his childhood in Georgia and the Chinese heritage of his mother's family, Silverstein founded the Peached Tortilla in 2010. He continued to take his cues from the burgeoning Los Angeles food truck scene and went the mobile route, using social media to let Asian-fusion food fans know where the truck would be on any given day.

Silverstein readily admits his first two years in business were a struggle for survival, with the transition to a brickand-mortar outlet as the ultimate longterm goal. "Once we finally started making money, I had the second truck custom-built based on what I'd learned up to that point," he reports. In order to build his clientele and name recognition, Silverstein arranged to participate in the food court at the Austin City Limits

Festival, founded Trailer Food Tuesdays on the terrace of the Long Center with trailer food maven Tiffany Harelik, and even competed in a nationally televised food truck cook-off on *Live With Kelly and Michael*. The same year he got his second truck on the road, Silverstein also began hosting pop-up dinners around town to test potential restaurant dishes and create a different kind of buzz for his brand, with the hope of attracting investors to help fulfill his restaurant dream. "By December of 2013, the brand finally had enough clout for me to sign the lease on this space," Silverstein says of the restaurant he opened in early December at 5520 Burnet Rd.

These days, Silverstein counts his blessings that his business is in a sustainable situation. The attractive restaurant offers parking, plenty of seating, an inviting menu of sharable fusion plates, and full bar service, all of which contribute to a more predictable bottom line. The food trucks are still available, but Silverstein envisions a future with more restaurant outlets rather than trucks, saying, "If you can make the leap out of a food truck, that's the biggest hurdle you can clear."



CHI'LANTRO KOREAN BBQ

Jae Kim started his food truck business in 2010, melding styles and flavors of popular Korean and Mexican street food items into a mouthwatering fusion that Austin diners soon found addictive. Whether it was bulgogi, burritos, quesadillas, or the signature kimchi fries, Kim's food always attracted crowds. About two years ago, he began the serious search for possible brick-and-mortar spots he could get into without taking on investors or incurring significant debt. The right affordable properties continued to elude him until late last year when a turnkey operation pretty much fell in his lap. Business partners Jerry Reid and chef John Bullington were looking for someone to take over the lease on the South Austin space where they ran the failed A-OK Chinese, and Kim was more than happy to take the lease off their hands. With a shoestring budget and a few weeks to change the decor, Kim and his team opened the first brick-and-mortar Chi'Lantro in January of this year at 1509 S. Lamar.

Neighborhood response to the opportunity to enjoy Chi'Lantro food in a restaurant with beer and wine has been very positive. Kim reports they survived the craziness of operating both food trucks and a restaurant during South by Southwest, and now they're settling into a good groove. Kim is so encouraged by the success of the first place, in fact, he's recently signed a lease on another abandoned restaurant location that he plans to get into fairly cheaply. He's shooting for a mid-May opening date for the second Chi'Lantro in the space vacated by Man Bites Dog at 5222 Burnet Rd.

Like his fellow food truck entrepreneur and new neighbor Silverstein, Kim is keeping his food trucks and trailers as an adjunct to the more sustainable restaurant outlets. "We have one at the Picnic on Barton Springs, we'll have one at the Domain food court when it opens, and we're keeping the third one mobile," says Kim. Because it wasn't necessary for him to build either restaurant location from the ground up, Kim has thus far been able to finance his company's expansion himself. His explanation? "We operate thin and tight!"

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
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SCREENS HELP Don Hertzfeldt's Digital Divide AGRESTA

THE "WORLD OF TOMORROW" IS HERE TODAY by Marc Saviov



Confession: Austin-based animator Don Hertzfeldt is, hands-down, my favorite living animator. Not because his multi-award-winning, Oscar-nominated, hand-drawn and 35mm, single-shot-animated shorts make me laugh out loud (although they frequently do), but because they so perfectly capture the tortured, insecure, and often outright terrifying pop-cultural angst-chaos inside my own head - and by extension the heads of so many of us who are frantically trying, and seemingly failing, to keep up with the frenzied revolutions of modern life. That Buñuel, Dalí, and Jan Svankmajer would dig the manic panic at the heart of Hertzfeldt's sad-funny stories is a given.

Hertzfeldt's most recent animated short, "World of Tomorrow," has just been released online after nabbing the Grand Jury Prize for Short Film at Sundance 2015 and winning the Best Animated Short category at SXSW 2015, among other kudos. The sans-sangfroid story remains similar to the animator's past thematic thrust: A little girl (voiced by the animator's 4-year-old niece) is visited by a future, cloned version of herself, who then spells out the depressing horrors of what's in store for humanity. But what marks this Hertzfeldt work as a major artistic turning point is that it's his first 100% digital creation, no rostrum camera necessary.

So does that mean he now has to stash his hard drives in a fireproof safe, as he famously did with thousands of pages of his hand-drawn animations years ago?

"I did have to actually think about that for the first time while working on 'World of Tomorrow,'" says Hertzfeldt, "the idea of getting a backup drive for the backup drive for the backup drive. But this is something I've been thinking about a lot lately. I'm a little scared of digital film in general for just that reason, for storage, for archival stuff. The film prints we can stash away and we know they last 100 years, at least, but with the digital stuff we have no real idea if they'll be readable in just a generation."

Granted, as anyone who's even the least bit familiar with Hertzfeldt's body of work already knows, this is a filmmaker whose entire aesthetic is intrinsically bound to anxiety, worry, and fear, albeit in a darkly whimsical, occasionally Dadaist fashion. But his concern for the future life of contemporary indie cinema is still rooted in a genuinely problematic situation.

"When you think back to the silent-film days, they say that something like 90 percent of all silent films are lost to us because they weren't archived. They weren't thought of as art or as being valuable. I feel that in another generation's time we're going to have this massive empty spot where all of these Sundance and South by indie films that didn't break through or that didn't get archived by a studio somewhere will just be gone. Because inevitably – and I'm thinking of my own stuff now – I'm going to be dead, and my family's going to have that backup drive of the backup drive, and at some point someone's going to screw up, right? The drive will be lost and that film will be gone ... forever."

It's comforting to know, then, that the film negatives for all of Hertzfeldt's older, handanimated films are safely locked away in the vault at the George Eastman House in Rochester, N.Y., where they will be preserved, presumably, in perpetuity. Not so, though, with his (or anybody else's) digital work.

"We have such a plastic society now," says Hertzfeldt. "But I was curious about [doing an all-digital animation]. I have some friends who are illustrators who can't stand drawing on a tablet because they miss the friction of paper. That wasn't a problem for me. ['World of Tomorrow'] is 100 percent Photoshop, Final Cut, and ProTools for sound. And that's it." ■





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Grimm Guignol

Ryan Gosling's directorial debut melds fantasy and realism BY RICHARD WHITTAKER

No nation on Earth self-mythologizes like the United States. Growing up in Montreal, the young Ryan Gosling fell under its spell. "Like any Canadian kid, you look to America and you have a romanticized idea of it," he said while at SXSW last month promoting his new film.

In Lost River, Gosling builds a new mythology, rewriting modern America as a post-industrial fantasy land. For his debut feature as writer and director, the star of Drive. Lars and the Real Girl. and Terrence Malick's upcoming, Austin-shot Weightless was drawn just across the border from his home country to Detroit, Mich. Gosling said, "It's the birthplace of the idea of the American Dream, at least as I knew it, with Motown and the Model T and the middle class. When I got there, it was very different from how I imagined it." He spent a year traveling around the city with a Red camera, and fell in love with its decay, and the strength of those living among the rubble. Their stories became the stream that led to Lost River, and Gosling was swept away when he found himself in the historic and decaying Michigan Palace Theater: "I shot this pan down from the ceiling, and there's this hole in the stage. I thought, one day, when I'm making the film, my lead character will come out of that hole. He will be born onto this stage."

A year later he returned, re-creating that very shot with a full crew. But it still took one last moment of inspiration for the actor to dare make the jump behind the camera. That came from Guillermo del Toro, whom Gosling called "the wizard who gave me my sword and my shield and sent me on my quest. He was the first person I told about this idea, that I had all these photographs of what I wanted to do. I showed them to him and he said if you don't direct it. I will. I don't know if he meant it, but I thought it was the coolest thing you could say."

Much like the swamp gothic of 2012's Beasts of the Southern Wild, Lost River refracts the classic story of American decay through Brothers Grimm folklore, making

the city both immediately identifiable as Detroit, and also a substitute for Anytown. USA. Gosling said, "I didn't want to get bogged down in the political minutiae. I felt what was happening was universal somehow, and I felt a fairy tale's format was the best way to communicate that." Detroit was his magic kingdom: Like the thorn bushes that engulfed Sleeping Beauty's castle, its evocatively named dog-strangling vine has reclaimed shuttered factories and pulled apart abandoned houses. "There are miles and miles of abandoned neighborhoods," Gosling said. "Within those neighborhoods there are pockets where there are families, and they will be the only family for blocks and blocks. The houses next to them are burnt down or being torn down, and yet they stay. It's moving. It's scary, and it feels for them that the dream has turned into a nightmare."

This is the second film this year set against Detroit's tragic urban blight. However, in breakout horror film It Follows, the teen protagonists are from the nice side of the Eight Mile divide, and view a trip to the rough parts of town as a daring adventure. The community of Lost River is that rough part of town, and its residents are bound to it by loyalty, yet desperate to escape. Fusing classic teen drama and immortal fairy tale, Bones (Iain De Caestecker) plays a version of the Springsteen hero as valiant knave, scavenging for treasure to fix his steed - a brokendown old car to get him across the city limits. Rat (Saoirse Ronan) is both the girl in the window next door and the princess whose beauty charms the animals. Gosling said, "The kids romanticize what is happening to them, because the reality is so much worse. If they can say that the world is this way because a spell has been cast on them, then at least it gives them a romantic filter to see their lives through."

Just as the city had informed Gosling's script, its haunted streets and discarded homes helped the cast discover who these characters really are. De Caestecker said, "When you go into these places, there's a tangible history, an energy you can feel in these houses that people have just left. I remember we went into one house, and there were just albums of old photos and baseball cards on the wall. You can't manufacture that. There's a ghostly presence you can feed off." He found the overgrown spaces and decaying structures pivotal for Bones as a questing

to inspire me? You have a similar thing with the character, where he's just walking about, trying to find some money to support his family for the next day."

For Ronan, the people of Motor City, and Gosling's willingness to weave them into the scenes, gave their scenes life. She said, "There were a lot of characters that we literally bumped into during a scene, and they were from Detroit, born and raised, and they'd share their stories with us."

Those moments provide context for Bones and Rat as dreaming children on the cusp of maturity. Yet for adults like Bones' mother (Christina Hendricks), fairy tale becomes fin de siècle horror. Gosling makes deliberate nods to the nihilistic creativity of Paris' infamous Théâtre du Grand-Guignol, whose graphic stage plays were the birth pangs of modern gory horror, and the legendary and lost Café de L'Enfer, Paris' morbid eatery in which diners consumed amid reliefs of diabolical tortures. He said, "There was a scene in early 20th century Paris that was very macabre, with these murder shows that were wildly realistic, and gave birth to horror cinema." He saw those same creative impulses and murky undercurrents in post-Katrina New Orleans. "These kinds of environments attract people with very dark intentions. These are places where nobody's watching, and you can get away with anything, if you have a dark instinct that you want to act out."

And then there's the evil beast Bully (Matt Smith), the raving brute torn straight from Walt Disney's worst fever dreams, a babbling monster running riot through the crumbling city. Gosling explained, "If society was functioning, he was probably a prescription away from being manageable." Instead, Bully is the "king of a place where there are no subjects, putting a La-Z-Boy in the back seat of a car and getting his friend to drive him around like it's his own version of the Popemobile." The casting of tall, skinny, pallid, and quintessentially British Smith, most famous as Doctor Who, as a Detroit tough man may seem unlikely. Yet it was Smith's performance as the mercurial and enigmatic Time Lord that gave Gosling the Frollo to Detroit's Notre Dame, the Jafar to Bones' Aladdin. He said, "I saw [Smith] screaming into a microphone, reading the riot act to these aliens in their spaceship. It was so commanding and compelling, and there's so much conviction in it, I just

thought, first of all, what a hell of an actor, but then, what would it be like to shoot that? I know, as an actor, that there would be nothing there, he was just yelling into a blue screen. I thought, my God, if you were there, he would have looked insane."

One of the most memorable scenes involves Bully almost flirting with an old woman called Momma M at a gas station – another of

those improvised scenes in which nonactors create a sense of verité amid the fantasy. Ronan said, "She took on this different character with Matt. He was great, and stepped up to do whatever she wanted to do." It's that vitality of spirit that, for Ronan, means there's no reason to give up on Motor City yet. "There's a sadness to Detroit," she said, "but there's also a life that's trying to burst through the surface. It went from being one of the most important cities in the world, and then it all started to fall apart, but that's what's fascinating about it, that it has gone full circle."

Bite the Power

The vampire wears a chador

It's been a terrorific time for fans of cinematic neckbiters lately. First came Jim Jarmusch's hypnotically sanguine *Only Lovers Left Alive*; then Jemaine Clement and Taika Waititi's *What We Do in the Shadows*, a deadon satire of vampiric tropes, opened just over a month ago; and now the audacious first feature from writer/director Ana Lily Amirpour has come to claim the title of the "world's first Iranian feminist vampire spaghetti western." It's a spooky, moody doozy of a debut, lensed by Director of Photography Lyle Vincent in a radiant monochrome that somehow makes even the darkness sparkle.

Bakersfield, Calif., doubles for the fictional Iranian town of Bad City, a gloomy gray amalgam of benighted alleyways, empty streets, and the occasional David Lynchian power plant. It's a zone populated entirely by criminals, victims, and the luckless ones caught in between. James Dean wannabe Arash (Marandi) and his junkie father (Manesh) are hounded by neighborhood dealer/scumbag Saeed (Rains), who also finds time to rough up the local prostitute (Marno) when he's not getting high on his own supply. In short, Bad City is aptly named.

Things change for the strange with the arrival – or maybe she's always been there? – of the titular girl (Vand, in a powerful and unearthly performance). Clad in a Jean Seberg striped shirt and a black chador, she's both predator and possibly an answer to unspoken prayers, an avenging fallen angel and close kin to Abel Ferrara's *Ms.* 45.

When the girl and Arash finally meet cute, you realize instantly that you're watching one of the great sequences in surreal, transgressive cinema (and never mind the genre). Returning from a costume party, Arash is miles high on ecstasy and dressed as Count Dracula

when the girl, imperiously skateboarding through the midnight streets, spots him out of the corner of her eye and doubles back. Her double take plays for laughs on a century of cinematic iconography, but this sublimely weird chance encounter soon turns into something approaching romance, or maybe not. Both the camera and the emotions perform a dance macabre with a chiaroscuro of impossibilities.

Allusions to film and cultural touchstones abound: Dreyer's seminal 1932 film *Vampyr*, the Bela Lugosi template, and even the West's highly imaginative media-fed mental picture of what Iran presumably looks like are all called up and craftily exploited. Much has been written about how *A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night* stylistically resembles Jarmusch's breakout film *Stranger Than Paradise*, but there's more *Dracula's Daughter* and *The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly* than Jim Jarmusch here, although Amirpour's film certainly *does* put a spell on you.

Speaking of which, I'd be undead if I failed to mention A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night's phenomenal soundtrack, which not only underscores the film's atmospheric, dreamy imagery but also establishes a retro-hip timelessness for the entire movie. Tracks by Tehran-based band Kiosk, Portland's Morricone-influenced Federale, and UK gothpoppers White Lies help to flesh out a story that is told - sparingly, at best - in Farsi. It's all of a piece, though. I'd go so far as to say that A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night is a cinematic riff on and alignment with the famed women's rights movement "Take Back the Night." But, you know, with somewhat more piercing incisors.





FREETOWN

Faith-based filmmaking has had a hell of a time when it comes to putting nonbelievers in seats. Try though they might, Christian

filmmakers have yet to sway the critical and popular perception that God – any god, pick your favorite! - belongs in a house of worship and not on the cineplex screen, that favorite of idolators everywhere. Heaven Is for Real, God's Not Dead, and The Book of Mormon Movie, Volume 1: The Journey end up being too preachy, or too poorly made, or just plain wander off into the narrative wilderness for what feels like 40 years. This isn't the case, thank God, with Freetown, the second feature from Mormon director Batty (The Saratov Approach). The film is based on the "true story" of six LDS missionaries unlucky enough to be preaching the gospel in Monrovia, Liberia, just as civil war breaks out in 1989.

Native Liberians all, they're caught between armed rebels backed by future Liberian presi-

dent and current crimes-against-humanity convict Charles Taylor and then-President Samuel Doe's government forces. As Monrovia, the capital, collapses around them, they decide to attempt a daring escape to neighboring Sierra Leone's Freetown. The hitch? It's 370 miles away, their jerry-rigged car only has five gallons of petrol in it, and, to top it off, local militia leader Ansa (Myers) has it out for one of them, Elder John Gaye (Michael), a member of the hated Krahn tribe.

With barely enough food and water, much less gasoline, these fervent young elders, along with church counselor and driver Abubakar (an extremely winning Adofo), strike out on their own, only to be stymied by endless roadblocks manned by AK-47-toting thugs, mechanical foul-ups, and godawful, mud-and-pothole-riven roadways.

The Mormon faith is never played down for the sake of lay audiences in this unusually gripping story. There's even comedy, of a sort, when one elder literally bores his way through yet another trigger-tense roadblock by proselytizing: "If you receive his gospel and repent, you will be happy. I'd love to share more with your friends!" he hollers as the elders are hastily waved through to the chagrin of the rebel gatekeeper. Divine providence, indeed.

Given the Mormon church's notorious history when it comes to people of color, interracial marriage, and, while we're at it, their recently updated views on LGBT and gender equality issues, skeptics might wonder if this is all a very pricey PR gimmick. Probably not. Cinematographer Jeremy Prusso catches some stunning imagery, Robert Allen Elliott's score is genuinely stirring, and the cast, most of whom are from Monrovia, is uniformly excellent. That said, anyone familiar with 1990s-era West African history will realize that these six missionaries have escaped the Liberian civil war only to (one assumes) become swept up Sierra Leone's own horrific fragmentation a year later. Oh, God. ***

GIRLHOOD

The adolescents in Girlhood's workingclass suburbs of Paris face all the usual slings and arrows thrust at emergent yet tentative identities, yet they also contend with being young women of color who face dead-end futures and few chances to escape the patriarchal strictures of their inherited culture. As with her previous film Tomboy, writer/director Sciamma demonstrates an acute sensitivity to the complications of growing up female. Titled Girlhood for its American release in an obvious ploy to be viewed as a counterpart to last year's widely hailed Boyhood, this film is better described by its original French title Bande de Filles, which translates as Girl Gang.

Marieme (Karidja Touré) is the eldest daughter in a family headed by a single mother and physically abusive older brother. They live in a cramped apartment in the projects outside Paris. Marieme's school grades aren't good enough to place her on a college track,

but she resists the prospect of vocational training. When she notices that a boy she has a crush on is friendly with a gang of three girls whom she had previously rejected, she about-faces and throws in with the group. In short order, her cornrows come undone and she starts straightening her hair and bullying other girls for their lunch money. Although gang life comes with its physical skirmishes, it also offers camaraderie, support, and a christening of sorts with her new name, Vic.

The nonprofessional actresses at the heart of the story exude a compelling naturalism, while dancing together to Rihanna's "Diamonds," their joy is captivating. Girlhood grows a bit fuzzy in its latter half as Marieme/Vic dons a skirt and blond wig and starts working as a drug courier. In fact, the film is never sharper than in its opening sequences. The initial images show girls playing American-style football, then walking home gleefully in a group. Their joviality grows quieter as the sounds of men idling in the streets grows louder, and their group numbers are steadily diminished as girls peel off toward their houses. It's during moments such as these, which show women silencing themselves in conformity to or self-protection against the world of men, that Sciamma's unique talents as a director soar. - Marjorie Baumgarten ***

THE LONGEST RIDE D: George Tillman Jr.; with Britt Robertson, Scott Eastwood, Alan Alda, Jack Huston, Oona Chaplin, Lolita Davidovich. (PG-13, 128 min.)

In this latest Nicholas Sparks romancer, a country boy and a city girl meet cute at the rodeo in present-day North Carolina. He's a bull rider named Luke (Eastwood, a dead ringer for dad Clint, only dunked in a bath of blandness), and she's an East Coast native named Sophia (Robertson, sparky but weightless) who's about to graduate from Wake Forest and debark for her dream job at a Manhattan art gallery. They're both demonstrably nice, and certainly nice-looking, but buyer beware any movie first date that fuzzes out the sound as soon as boy and girl start talking. There's little here to convince the audience of boy and girl's special chemistry, and nothing to attach the audience to them, either.

At the tail end of that first date, Luke and Sophia come across a car wreck and pull the elderly driver, Ira Levinson (Alda), to safety. "My box," he croaks, half-dead. If you've been paying any attention to the Nicholas Sparks playbook, you already know the box contains love letters - Sparks is powerfully devoted to epistolary romance - and they will be the gateway to a second love story, this one set in sepia 50 years prior.

"Ambitious" is too generous a word for The Longest Ride, but there's no denying

that the mega-bestselling, devoutly Christian Sparks - and his adapters - aren't at least trying out some new material: The professional bull-riding circuit, a midcentury art movement, and even (Christ almighty!) two Jewish characters are a few of the curlicues inserted into his usual plodding line to true love everlasting. Oona Chaplin, as Ira's World War II-era inamorata, is magnetic onscreen, and director George Tillman Jr. (The Inevitable Defeat of Mister & Pete) milks bull riding's storied eight seconds for a standout slowmotion sequence late in the film – but they're only flare guns of interest shot out from a sea of dross, and the brightest spots in a picturesque but tiresomely insensate film. A third-act twist, in which these nice and nicelooking people are handsomely rewarded for so much niceness, has all the narrative sophistication of a 10-year-old closing her eyes and wishing dreamily before blowing out the candles.

LOST RIVER D: Ryan Gosling; with Christina Hendricks, Jain De Caestecker, Saoirse Ronan, Eva Mendes, Matt Smith, Ben Mendelsohn, Barbara Steele, Reda Kateb, Landyn Stewart. (R, 95 min.)

In this moody film by debuting writer/director Ryan Gosling, Lost River is the name of a place, as well as a metaphor for the town's forgotten people and unfulfilled dreams. Declining incomes and potential have driven most residents from its borders. The landscape is dotted with abandoned homes and businesses: but for the characters we encounter in the film, Lost River is a veritable ghost town in which there are only predators and prey. No wonder the little ones worry about the monsters outside their doors.

The film is richer in atmosphere than story, and Gosling's directorial influences are easy to detect. Borrow a little weirdness and sexual kink from David Lynch, some ethereal narrative aura from Terrence Malick, grim human interactions from Gaspar Noé (while also employing Noé's frequent cinematographer Benoît Debie), and garish, oversaturated lighting designs from Nicolas Winding Refn. These influences contribute a visual signature for Lost River, but narratively, the film is a roiling cauldron of leftovers.

Billy (Hendricks) lives in her run-down home with her family of two boys, toddler Franky (Stewart) and teen Bones (De Caestecker). Bones steals copper from abandoned buildings to earn money to fund his escape from Lost River. In this activity. he is thwarted by aptly named Bully (Smith), who wears a gold jacket and rides around town in a lounge chair mounted on the back of a Cadillac convertible, yelling to the skies that all the town's copper belongs to him. When Billy asks for mercy on her adjustable mortgage from the sleazy banker Dave (Mendelsohn), he sets her up with work at his sex and horror club overseen by Cat (Mendes). Bones also has feelings for the girl next door, Rat (Ronan) - Billy, Bully, Rat, Cat: what's up with these names? - who lives with her mute grandmother (former scream queen Steele). Additionally, some buildings burn, and a submerged, underwater city plays into the film's ominous lore.

Lost River is a film whose reputation precedes it. Viewers have decried it as a mess or lauded it as an artistic achievement ever since it premiered at Cannes 11 months ago. Ultimately, the film is really neither. Yes, Gosling's ambition exceeds his accomplishment, but what he's delivered is hardly a disaster. Like Dave the banker says: Everybody has to do the "shimmy shimmy ya" and Gosling's film is no exception. Expect no further clarity.

MERCHANTS OF DOUBT D: Robert Kenner. (PG-13, 96 min.)

Revealing little new about the political lobbyists that Thank You for Smoking slyly skewered a decade ago, Merchants of Doubt adopts a similarly glossy visual persona, playing up motifs of card games and con artists as director Robert Kenner (Food, Inc.) identifies and dismantles the recurring representatives and tactics used to spin the agendas of Big Tobacco, Big Pharma, and Big Oil in Congressional hearings and the media over the course of several years.

Based on Naomi Oreskes and Erik M. Conway's book of the same name, Kenner's documentary makes clear the proven value of supposed experts casting significant doubt on seemingly incontrovertible evidence in the public eye, a strategy epitomized by tobacco companies successfully diverting the blame from a need for self-extinguishing cigarettes to a need for less flammable furniture, the chemicals for which resulted in a slew of subsequent health problems.

The film is most damning when pointing out well-paid figureheads and their preferred methods of obfuscation, such as the doctor who successfully appealed to politicians on an emotional level by claiming on three separate occasions to have treated three severely burned babies - never once while under oath. Petitions signed with thousands of phony names bolster counterarguments all the same, and think-tank mouthpieces are given equal weight on cable news segments

by virtue of shouting down the easy-to-ignore jargon of well-meaning scientists.

Despite an effort to establish how such concerns have and should transcend partisan thinking, Kenner largely preaches to the leftleaning choir with plenty of hissable sound bites and a generally glib tone that undercuts an otherwise understandable sense of righteous indignation. (It's the kind of doc that unloads a number of *Twilight Zone* clips to get an easy laugh the moment a talking head references its topsy-turvy worldview.)

Worse yet, *Merchants* spends much of its running time exposing trends of political subterfuge before working in an earnest call to action regarding climate change. Using the same type of tinkling score and shots of children at play as campaign ads shown earlier in the film, this late-inning agenda comes off as noble as it is hypocritical. Regardless of one's personal beliefs, it's tough to respect a movie that ultimately invites viewers to question every case of propaganda except its own.

For 20 years now, writer-director Noah Baumbach has cast an amusing eye on characters stuck in some sort of rut, whether they suffer from post-grad ennui (*Kicking* & *Screaming, Frances Ha*) or middle-aged malaise (*Greenberg*). His latest film, *While We're Young*, skews closer generationally to the latter, bringing Ben Stiller back into the fold as struggling documentarian Josh who, along with wife Cornelia (Watts), finds himself reinvigorated by an unlikely friendship with Brooklyn twentysomethings Jamie (Driver) and Darby (Seyfried).

Josh has blown the better part of a decade trying to finish his current nonfiction endeavor, a six-hour opus vaguely about "power in America," while trapped under the shadow of Cornelia's much-lauded father-in-law, Leslie (Grodin, always a welcome presence). To Josh, the newfound hipster couple's appropriation of everything that his generation

had previously disposed is endearing; when Jamie tries to rev Josh up using Survivor's "Eye of the Tiger," Josh points out, "I remember when this song was just considered bad." As friends their own age (Dizzia and former Beastie Boy Horovitz) find themselves consumed by domestic responsibilities, Josh and Cornelia are eager to fill that social void with walking, talking reminders of their own waning potential.

The result isn't entirely riotous – a midmovie sequence involving ayahuasca falls oddly flat – yet Baumbach weaves in plenty of droll observations about the bittersweet burden of middle age and the millennial tendency to transform yesterday's nostalgia into today's kitsch. The story stumbles once the wedge between this revitalized couple and their forsaken friends becomes a wedge between a newly wary Josh and everyone else around him, leaving the story's women stranded while Stiller works himself into a trademark neurotic lather opposite an increasingly oily Driver.

These late-coming concerns about the blurred lines between characters helping themselves to other people's lives rather than their culture could have formed the basis of its own feature-length generational statement, but instead, *While We're Young* struggles to reconcile its protagonists' rival impulses to either welcome an unexpected source of youthful vitality with open arms or embrace such an individual so as to better displace them from one's lawn.

© WHITE GOD D: Kornél Mundruczó; with Zsófia Psotta, Sándor Zsótér, Lili Horváth, Luke, Body. (R, 121 min., subtitled)

The winner of the Un Certain Regard prize at the 2014 Cannes Film Festival, Kornél Mundruczó's *White God* finally arrives on domestic shores, and it is every bit the beguiling work that that particular award recognizes. Blending political allegory with the tropes of teen comingof-age films, *White God* begins as a tale about a girl separated from her dog, and ends up being the *Battleship Potemkin* of canine mutiny.

Lili (Psotta) is a music student in Prague who goes to stay with her estranged father, Dániel (Zsoter) when her mother has to go abroad for a conference. A bit of a loner, Lili's best friend is Hagen, a mixed-breed dog who's as loyal as they come. When a combination of societal pressure and resentment causes Dániel to turn Hagen loose into the streets of Prague, that's when this Incredible Journey begins. Alternating between Lili navigating the world of adulthood and Hagen traversing the world of homeless dogs (with the help of a scene-stealing Jack Russell terrier), the film diverges into two complementary narrative threads: Lili's burgeoning adulthood and Hagen's descent into the brutality of life on the streets, especially after he's been nabbed by an underground dogfight trainer, and forced to participate in those barbaric bouts.

Eschewing CGI, the director coaxes performances from, in some sequences, 280 dogs running around the streets of Prague. but mostly we follow Hagen (played by two dogs, Luke and Body), and the performance that Mundruczó gets from these leading dogs (with the help of trainers, of course) is nothing short of amazing. It's tempting to become exhausted playing "how did they do that?" but thankfully, the story is so compelling, you forget you're watching dogs act; the craftsmanship of this film is that stunning. There is a vagueness to Mundruczó's theme, incorporating eugenics, classism, and the struggles of the oppressed, but it works because of the amazing performances and the risky, genredefying filmmaking that he throws into this kitchen-sink narrative. As an always-welcome entry into the "oppressed will insurrect." genre, White God is not only a superlative film, but a feat of kinetic filmmaking that is rarely seen. Call the shelter; this one's a keeper. **** Josh Kupecki

WOMAN IN GOLD D: Simon Curtis; with Helen Mirren, Ryan Reynolds, Daniel Brühl, Katie Holmes, Tatiana Maslany, Max Irons, Charles Dance, Antje

Take a complex legal issue like the provenance of an art object, then throw in Helen Mirren and the Nazis as the hero and villains, and you have the dull and simplified tale of *Woman in Gold*.

Gustav Klimt's spectacular painting Portrait of Adele Bloch-Bauer I far outshines this pedestrian movie about the legal battle waged by Maria Altmann (Mirren), the niece of the portrait's subject, to regain possession of the work which was seized from her family by the Nazis during their takeover of Austria. Based on true events, the film recounts the process by which Altmann, long since relocated to California, and her inexperienced lawyer Randy Schoenberg (Reynolds), grandson of the famous Austrian composer, fought in the Austrian and American courts to win back that painting, along with five other Klimts. With history having already foretold the case's conclusion, Woman in Gold draws its narrative tension from Altmann's flashbacks to her gilded childhood and flight from the Nazi horrors.

Mirren's performance, as always, is beyond reproach, even though the character's hauteur makes her a somewhat disagreeable person. Reynolds, however, as the young lawyer in over his head seems reflective of the actor's lack of dimension in the movie. Many good supporting actors (Holmes, Pryce, and Fischer, for starters) appear fleetingly; however, more interplay from them might have helped make Woman in Gold a more human story than that of evil Nazi looters and Austrian bureaucrats versus good Jewish patrons of the arts and vindicators of family heritage. The story of the provenance of the stunning Klimt painting embedded in gold leaf, which the Austrians' came to regard as their country's Mona Lisa, is more complicated than this screenplay by Alexi Kaye Campbell will allow. Nevertheless, the flattening of the legal issues is not what sunders Woman in Gold, it's the story's wan drama and fixed characterizations.

When the course of true love finally runs smooth, the look of contented happiness on her face as she gazes at her husband-to-be (nicely played by Madden) is the pay-off you've been waiting for the entire movie. The road to redemption is paved with all the usual pitfalls, and while the film dips into schmaltz on occasion, Danny Collins - for the most part - manages to rise above its predictability. A more efficient indifference generator than last spring's Divergent, dutiful follow-up Insurgent spares us a reel's worth of training montages as young heroine Tris (Woodley) and boyfriend Four (James) remain on the run from the oppressive Jeanine (Winslet), militant ruler of a near-future Chicago where most denizens have been split into five factions: Abnegation, Amity, Candor, Dauntless, and Erudite. Co-director, writer, and lead Jermaine Clement was. famously, one of the creators and stars of Flight of the Conchords, and with this pointed send-up of Twilight tropes and undead issues, he brings a similar, faux-naif comic sensibility to the semi-moribund vampire genre. Set up as a fake documentary, an all-but-unseen film crew records the nightly routines of a group of vampire flatmates in Wellington, New Zealand: medieval-torture-loving Vladislav (Clement); former 18th century dandy Viago (Waititi); borderline-feral wild child Deacon (Brugh); and 8,000-year-old Max Schreck lookalike Petyr (Fransham). A newly turned but not yet fully accepted vampire named Nick (Gonzalez-Macer) and his nerd-pal Stu (Rutherford) round out the ensemble of losers through the ages. A gently parodic tone prevails in what is ultimately a pretty sweet take on bloodsuckers. While it's hardly a genre mile-, er, tombstone, What We Do in the Shadows is cleverly executed, and occasionally inspired, in its affectionate silliness. (02/27/2015) ***1 – Marc Savlov

Crafted around ordinary people and unordinary twists, each tale in the sextet is self-contained - though all six are thematically linked, serving up a shot of vengeance with a karma chaser, a quenching gulp of human lunacy. By turns brutal, frightening, and darkly humorous. Szifrón's brilliant compilation of cinematic madness is no wild tale. It's a fucking insane one in this thing we call la vida loca. 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

Experiencing a Broadened Euphoria

If **ACL Fest** is Austin's **Lollapalooza**, **Euphoria Fest** exists as our equivalent of Miami's **Ultra Music Festival**: an EDM utopia where DJs are gods, ostentatious light shows provoke spiritual transcendence, and the quality of the weekend will be judged by experience over performance value.

Austin's largest electronic music gathering expects 10,000 attendees per night to East Austin's **Carson Creek Ranch** (9507 Sherman), many of them campers. DJs armed with laptops and thumb drives full of big hits remain the bread-and-butter of the 4-year-old fest: EDM superstar **Pretty Lights** (Sat.), dubstep duo **Adventure Club** (Fri.), and trap king **RL Grime** (Sun.). But Euphoria also fleshes out to offer diversity beyond the decks.

Deviants from the DJ this year include confounding Swedish rapper **Yung Lean** (Sun.), computer-enhanced instrumentalists **STS9** (Fri.), lysergic electronica artists **Thievery Corporation** (Sun.), and swaggering electro pop duo **Ghostland Observatory** (Sat.). The latter, a once-breakout local act lately snoozing on hiatus, plays its first local gig since 2012. "Thomas [Turner] and I are the best we've ever been friendship-wise," says the duo's vocalist **Aaron Behrens**, who maintains a carefree perspective on his band's future. "We just got the offer and said, 'Sounds cool, let's go have some fun!'"

Euphoria's clientele may be too young to be familiar with Ghostland Observatory. The age of the average ticket holder sits currently at 25 - up a few years from last year.

"I think the addition of some of the 'jam bands' changed our demographics," supposes the fest's 30-year-old founder and creative director **Mitch Morales**. "That's what's cool about it. Now you have this mix that's pretty heavily millennial, but we also have a lot of young working professionals whose reason for going to festivals is getting away for a weekend."

That's an underlying theme for Morales, a graduate of Georgetown High School, who was working in energy finance five years ago when a trip to Michigan's **Rothbury Festival** opened his mind to the unique energy and community of camping festivals.

"It goes back to earlier times in mankind

when there was just time for music and dancing and a communal experience," he attests.

While Morales admits getting into the speculative business of running a music festival might be the dumbest thing he's ever done, he's had marked early success. Attendance has risen annually and the immersive experience he hoped to cultivate continues to blossom: Euphoria now includes healthy eating and innovative recycling workshops as well as yoga. The camping vibe also sweetens with a new layout annexing more ground at Carson Creek, now hosting the fest for its second year. In Carson Creek, Morales believes he's found Euphoria's permanent home.

Lately there's been trouble in paradise. This week, complaints from a neighboring farmer – upset about dust, lights, and music volume coming from the property – caused **County Commissioners** to delay the issuance of mass gathering permits required for upcoming events at Carson Creek Ranch until the parties could agree to a resolution.

Joan Havard, who manages the 55-acre ranch her 102-year-old grandmother still

lives on, found herself in a Catch-22. Following several hearings and a meeting with Travis County Judge Sarah Eckhardt, Havard said she was informed that, in order for promoters to receive mass gathering permits for upcoming events including Euphoria, Untapped, and Levitation (né Austin Psych Fest), she must agree to early cut-off times: 10pm Sunday through Thursday and midnight Friday through Saturday. Before this issue went to press, she told the Chronicle she planned to accept the agreement so upcoming festivals won't be jeopardized. As Havard understands it, end times for music at Euphoria or Levitation will not change this year, but all events thereafter will be limited. When asked if other event spaces in Travis

When asked if other event spaces in Travis County that don't sit within city limits would face similar restrictions if a neighbor complained, a representative from the County Commissioners office offered no comment, citing "ongoing negotiations."

County politics is of little concern to the droves of young EDM fans living for the bass drop. For them, only Euphoria awaits.

HALF NOTES

RED EYED FLY has been acquired by **Elysium** and **Valhalla** owner **John Wickham** and a group of unspecified partners. Wickham tells "Playback" he signed a lease for "a good length of time" on the venue shortly before **South by Southwest** and has upgraded the sound system. The building's two stages should provide ample room for the brave event booking Wickham already does at Elysium, as well as serving "local bands who might otherwise fall through the cracks." Whether the club's name will change remains undecided.

BLIND LEADING THE BLIND: Stevie Wonder

AGONY COLUMN STILL STANDING

The band that united the pentagram and Confederate flag returns to action this Saturday after 18 years spent largely out of commission. **Agony Column's** comeback isn't merely a matter of reunion, but of renewed spirit amongst its members.

A true musical oddity of its time, locals Agony Column crossbred thrash metal with gun-rack-glorifying redneck declarations shrieked like a hillbilly **Rob Halford** by vocalist **Richie Turner**. Their bizarre Southern satire, first sprouted in 1985, found a national audience after tours with **Gwar** and **Biohazard** then attained recorded glory through its 1989 LP *God, Guns, & Guts*. The genocidal tendencies of that record's title track depict an apocalyptic battle between countrified Christians and the government.

"At the time, those lyrics were fantasy and now it's almost become reality," confides founding guitarist Stuart Lawrence, shaking his head. "There are so many Americans that are frightened of their government and think they need to defend themselves."

The pitchforks and 4x4 trucks were all a farce.

"I was from Boston and I was fascinated with anything Texas," says Turner. "I thought this dumb redneck stuff was a great schtick to run with. As delusional as I might have been, it only came in the form of fantasy."

In their late Eighties/early Nineties heyday, Agony Column's sizable local cult converged in mosh pits on the floor of **Liberty Lunch**. Turner described it like "a meat grinder."

"People would try to kill each other while we played! It was like the audience had rabies," he says. "They smashed the toilets and climbed over the walls and gigantic fat guys crushed tiny petite girls in the front row. It was just out of control."

Not long after German label **Koch** released Agony Column's third album, *Way Back in the Woods*, in 1995, Turner did hard time in Huntsville on drug charges. Continued issues with a speed addiction and incarceration brought Agony Column to a halt in 1997.

"Most of the people in my life were pretty discouraged with me, including myself," says Turner. He left Texas to start a new life, making stops in Florida, Nevada, and New Mexico. During that time he got a straight job




as a utility operator and started a family.

"Family life is nice," he says. "But if anyone gives me an inkling that I could go back, I would do it because music was me, man."

After a divorce, Turner returned to Austin and joined up with Lawrence, bassist **Billy Dansfiell**, and drummer **Charlie Brownell** – Agony Column's lineup since 1993 – to kickstart the band that only reunited three times this millennium. Saturday night at the Lost Well, Turner will grip the mic and scream Hellbilly metal for the first time in years.

"I couldn't be happier to be back in Austin and playing with Agony Column," he says. "I need to make amends with my band and my town."

Siempre Selena

South Texas' inaugural Fiesta de la Flor will be historic

Most Selena fans have experienced her more frequently in slow motion than at regular speed. Consider the number of tributes, in-memoriam TV specials, posthumous music videos featuring clips slowed down to half-speed, not to mention the hundreds of unofficial fan eulogies all over the web – virtual *ofrendas*, immortalizing as beatified saint the young singer murdered in her prime.

Close your eyes and there she is: whipping that massive black mane, pageant waving, then turning those dizzying spins for which her purple jumpsuit became legend. So much blurry slo-mo. Gauzy, dreamlike.

CORAZÓN

March, 1995, Austin. Change hung in the air. South by Southwest moved to the new Austin Convention Center. KOOP 91.7FM prepared to launch. Spoon cut its fulllength debut for Matador Records.

Down south, Texas native and Corpus Christi homegirl Selena Quintanilla-Pérez, lead singer of Los Dinos and a young fixture on the Tejano/Latin music charts, recorded a crossover album that had fans and industry honchos alike perched, awaiting her ascent into superstardom. On the last day of the month – "Black Friday," as the day became known – her life ended with a bullet. Superstardom happened anyway.

Dreaming of You, released three months after the singer's murder, hit No. 1 on the Billboard 200.

In Texas, young Stephanie Bergara and Claudia Zapata had a hard time moving on. For the former, now a programming specialist with Austin's Music & Entertainment Division, it was personal. She was 8 when Selena died.

"Listening to music – anything pop culture-y – seemed so much sadder for a really long time," says Bergara today.

For 10-year-old Zapata, music played a bigger role than the backing track of a traditional Tex-Mex upbringing. On a family trip to Europe, her sister's Selena megamix cassette touched a nerve.

"It was so good," she recalls excitedly. "It was funny, it was clever, it had a really good beat. [Los Dinos'] ear was trained – not just for the very specific rhythmic quality of regional Mexican music – but for this diaspora of American funk, R&B, and cumbia."

An undeniable edge in Los Dinos' sound, says Zapata, was "Chris' guitar – the Chris licks."

NO PUEDO DEJAR DE PENSAR EN TI

Chris, of course, is Chris Pérez, lead guitarist of Los Dinos and husband to Selena. Besides breaking out the early career of one Jenny from the block, Gregory Nava's 1997 film *Selena* made the case for Pérez not being your typical Tejano player. The scene where actor Jon Seda (as Chris) is auditioning for Selena's dad, Abraham (played by Edward James Olmos), cuts to a close-up of guitarist hands tapping out crazy Eddie Van Halen-style riffs.

That close-up: Chris Pérez's hands. After Selena's death, he continued in music, playing with A.B. Quintanilla & the Kumbia Kings and racking up a Grammy for his first LP, *Resurrection*.

Austin Chronicle: What's one moment of sheer musical bliss or epiphany that happened with Los Dinos?

Chris Pérez: When I first heard the Selena Live!

tracks. We'd just taken a big creative step. The way Selena attacked songs, I knew I had to bust out of this [Tejano guitar] formula. I shouldn't have to rely on these upchunks, you know? Obviously I can't get all Pantera or Nirvana on your ass, but ... [laughs].

Listen to "Techno Cumbia," or even the conjunto-type songs, where I'd double the electric with an acoustic in an effort to mimic a bajo-sexto sound. In other songs like "No Debes Jugar," "La Llamada" – there's some little guitar nuggets in there.

We had just finished mixing *Live!* Abraham was all excited to hear the mix. When he got to the new shit, his head blew up. "What are y'all thinking?! They're not ready for this shit!" Guess what? Those were the two biggest songs we ever had, up to that point. Even today, that shit sounds hot. Back then when we played it, whoooooo, we were breaking the law.

AC: Your 2012 book, To Selena With Love, seemed like a punctuation mark, a bit of closure for you and that part of your public life.

CP: I got to clarify a lot of things in a cool way. I did not want the book to be some kind of tell-all, but I got to talk about Selena and the way she was off the stage.

With the book, I got to shine a light on her and let people know and see that she was a great person offstage as well. And it wasn't just talk. When she said, "Don't do drugs and stay in school," or when she spoke up about domestic abuse, she [was standing up] for what she believed.

Also, you know, it wasn't all butterflies and flowers and roses all the time. And I put some of that in there, too.

WOULD YOU SEE WHAT'S INSIDE?

Claudia Zapata reflects, "She became this legend. Like any rock star who dies young, they stay young forever. You never really hear anything bad about Selena."

"We have her crystallized in that sense of potential," says author and UT Associate Professor of English Deborah Paredez, whose 2009 book, *Selenidad: Selena, Latinos, and the Performance of Memory*, traces the mark left by the singer on Latin cultural identity. "She had genuine talent. She could sing, and she could dance – [important now] in these days of post-AutoTune."

Likewise, Texas music bon vivant Joe Nick Patoski, author of Selena biography *Como La Flor* (1997), wonders about the "what-ifs." Selena was a music business "game changer," he says.

"She elevated Latin music out of its regional sound. We're still in the midst of that change," he adds, noting the impact of contemporary alt-Latino artists like Austin's Gina Chavez or San Antonians Piñata Protest and Nina Diaz of Girl in a Coma.

Paredez speaks of the singer's impact as an enduring icon, not only for Latino/as, but

also "for a queer community coming off the age of AIDS. So many young people taken too soon, but also, in a way, the culture surviving that."

Anyone with a toe in to any Southwestern gay bar knows the extent of her appeal in the drag circuit. Even 20 years later, Selena resides in the pantheon amongst other onename divas: Cher, Madonna, Beyoncé. Or as Patoski chirps, "More drag queens, por favor!"

"She never really got to fully realize what she wanted to do," he says. "Unlike *telenovela* stars of the time, Selena did not have bleached hair or pale skin. That sent a pretty powerful message."

Paredez concurs: "Selena died before she was forced to dye her hair."

THERE'S NOWHERE IN THE WORLD I'D RATHER BE

AC: Selena y Los Dinos are credited with changing the face of Latin music. Where's the Guitar World or Guitar Player Chris Pérez interview? You've got decades of shredding, composing, Grammys: Do you feel taken seriously?

CP: I feel taken seriously by people who love to listen to music. As far as that other stuff, it would be nice, but I don't think about it. In this business, you have to have a thick skin. Like when I won the Grammy – there was a lot of backbiting. Winning a Grammy was not as fucking awesome as it should have been.

AC: OK, silly question: Where do you keep your Grammy?

CP: My mom's house. She had my first Gold record as well, which we got with Selena for the album *Ven Conmigo* – the black-and-white cover of her in that sideways pose, and her face ...

I never hung up any of my Gold or Platinum records, and there's quite a few, especially after Selena passed away, because of the Latin genre explosion. Again, I was in a different headspace.

AC: Is there any artist you've been compared to that took you aback?

CP: Carlos Santana invited me to play with him in Corpus Christi years ago. Long story short, I said no, but they sent someone to get me, basically dragged me to the venue. I get backstage, and he comes out: "Where's your guitar?" I said, "You were serious? I didn't bring it. I just came to enjoy the show." So he goes where his guitars are laid out – the iconic yellow Paul Reed Smith and the other one, the greenish-blue Paul Reed Smith, the Santana signature series, *the* freaking guitars! What does he do? He picks up the green one and goes, "Here. I want to jam with you."

A light came down from the sky and everything!

He picks up the other guitar. "Okay, so if I start playing this..."

So, I start slowly, kind of soulfully, and he's like, "Nah, nah. Do that *other* stuff."

"What stuff?" And he goes, "That *stuff*! Like that close-up of the hands in the movie!" Fingerboard, tapping B.S.

"Are you serious?" And he goes, "Well, yeah. You kind of remind me of that dude." I said. "What dude?"

"Eddie Van Halen!"

So I obeyed the master and went out [during Santana's encore]. There was a twohanded tap fest onstage, man.

CÓMO TE NECESITO

"Selena was the first person I saw on television that looked like me or someone in my family. That was the first time I identified with my heritage," says Stephanie Bergara. "I remember being so mad at my mom because she wouldn't let me audition to be Selena in the *Selena* movie."

In hindsight, she concedes mama's good sense. None of which matters, because Stephanie Bergara fronts Bidi Bidi Banda, Austin's first all-star Selena tribute band. This month, the band has been hustling to honor the 20th anniversary of Selena's passing, serving up playful memories – musical hugs, really – during times of great collective pain and commemoration.

When Claudia Zapata first saw a cassette of the singer on her mother's dresser, she was knocked out by what stared back at her. "As a little queer girl, unbeknownst to

me, I was completely struck."

She remembers clearly the day after the news broke.

"Everyone was wearing their shirts: The *Amor Prohibido* cover, with the ruffles, white shirt, leather jacket, pouty lips. Selena was like Latinos' JFK."

Now, Zapata's a member of local art and culture jammers Puro Chingon Collective, hosting an interactive screening of *Selena* for Fusebox Arts Festival this week.

MI AMOR, CÓMO TE EXTRAÑO

AC: So many only know you from the movie. Was there one moment related to the portrayal of you that made you go, "Hmmm," or scratch your head?

CP: The real question would be if there was one part that I thought hit the nail on the head. It was basically *all* head-scratching, chin-rubbing, "What the ...?" But I have to take a lot of the credit for the exaggeration. I was in a crazy place. I clammed up. I stopped doing TV interviews, especially on the Latin side of things. Partly because of what had happened to my wife and partly because the media turned me into a hermit. Every time I tried to do these interviews or shows, it was super-sensational: slowing the footage down, playing sad music, pulling heartstrings.

AC: But you eventually came around and worked with the movie crew?

CP: When Jon [Seda] got the part, we started hanging out quite a bit. That's an understatement. We were so much alike. We liked the same kind of music: Iron Maiden, Judas Priest, Van Halen, AC/DC. He wanted to learn to play guitar, so I helped him out.

AC: You referred to the movie getting one thing right?

CP: The scene in the movie when [Selena/J-Lo] comes to the hotel and [proposes to Chris/Jon], "We need to get married. That's the only way this is going to work!"

I got to tell Jon the feeling behind everything that happened, how I reacted to her. Before that, he and I never really "went there" when it came to my relationship with Selena. He'd seen me hanging out with [Los Dinos] Ricky, Joe, A.B., and Suzette, but the one thing nobody outside the circle would know is how Selena and I acted together.



There was nobody in that room except Selena and I, and they got it right.

COMO LA FIESTA

In late January, the city of Corpus Christi announced the first of what will be an annual festival to honor the memory and legacy of the beloved Texan superstar. Scheduled for Friday and Saturday, April 17-18, downtown in North Bayfront Park, the first historic Fiesta de la Flor will feature a glitterati of artists, including Grammy winners Los Lobos, Little Joe y La Familia, and members of Selena Quintanilla's family, including Pérez. The who's who of Tejas talent also includes Las Fenix, Clarissa Serna, Nina Diaz, and more.

This marks the first significant citywide tribute in collaboration with Selena's parent (literally) organization, Q Productions.

AC: This is a crazy Grammy-laden bill; who are you most excited to see or to play with? CP: Honestly, as big-headed as it's going to sound, I'm most excited to play with my guys. We've got some really cool things going on. I want things to be a surprise. This is a once-in-a-lifetime thing. I know that it's likely to happen again, but at this point, this is the one and only "Selena Fest."

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KENDRICK LAMAR To Pimp a Butterfly (Interscope)

A sampled vocal of Jamaican crooner Boris Gardiner poses a question as explicit and prescient now as when asked in 1974: "Who will deny that you and I and every nigger is a star?" Trekking barbwire thickets of the dense, pitfall-enriched forest called "existence of (successful) black men," Kendrick Lamar machetes strange new arteries into the heart of the concrete jungle. Rejecting all actions from his debut, one of the great bows in any genre - 2012's good kid, m.A.A.d city - the Compton wordsmith blazes new ground in our most vital and still blossoming art form, using live jazz and West Coast G-funk arrangements as its exposed nervous and circulatory system. To Pimp a Butterfly thus wades away from the shallow end, and into the opaque trenches not only of black music, but the existentialism of blackness in America. A masochist Lamar personalizes answers to the overarching question by parsing out each piece. In the Parliamentary "Wesley's Theory," the antagonist "Who" is the Man, regretful of letting the darker hues prosper as bass god Thundercat laments: "We should never gave niggas money, go back home." The other "who" dwells in the boozy "u," finding the raw, drunken rapper screaming in complete horror and engulfed by whale-sized survivor's guilt over his success. By "For Sale?" the denial of stardom to both "you and I" ends up in the hands of the self especially in the face of the nefarious Lucy. A beautiful composite pimp, she aims to



satiate the faithful Kendrick into submission: "I loosely heard prayers on your first album truly/ Lucy don't mind cause at the end of the day you'll pursue me." Having realized himself through experience (including rotation burners "The Blacker the Berry" and Off the Wall-era "These Walls"), the MC's confidence rebounds by the revamped "i," where he compels every black man to step up in name of the divisive "nigger" and its African blue blood roots. Even more specifically, he urges them to answer their own question(s) by refusing denial of their own stardom. Stepping upward into the macro, the album's landmark achievement lies in Kendrick Lamar's elevation of hiphop into subtle invisibility, his blackness not exclusively tied to the rapper image. Incredibly, for the first time, the audacious urgency of rap flattens out into a reduced essence while becoming, at once, a medium completely subservient to its message. - Kahron Spearman *****



STEVIE WONDER Frank Erwin Center, April 4

In the age of social media, the overuse of superlatives tends to render each assessment meaningless. How many times was Joe Blow's band "amazing" this week? Then someone like Stevie Wonder returns. His three-plus hour re-creation of the 1976 album Songs in the Key of Life laid out a sprawling extravaganza of song and emotion. It took nearly 30 musicians, a string section, and a gospel chorus to mirror the 100 or so who participated in the original production. Wonder, 64, dominated the proceedings, but

he shared the stage, giving performers like singer India Arie, harpist Frédéric Yonnet, backing vocalist Jasmin Cruz, and band leader Greg Phillinganes their own time to shine. In between, Wonder proved master, delivering heart songs, protest songs, cold funk, witty humor, spiritual praise, and - above all else - love. Even though Songs in the Key of Life now inches toward 40, its social commentary might still address today's headlines. The album's peppered with songs Wonder described as "the songs of the black experience." He opened with a short sermon expressing a disdain for hate before launching into the pioneering "Black Man" and "Village Ghetto Land," which describes the hopelessness of inner-city life. Wonder also carried joy: the horn riffs of "Sir Duke" and second set opener "Isn't She Lovely," with its imaginative harmonica solo. The harmonica was given special treatment on the instrumental "Easy Goin' Evening (My Mama's Call)," with Wonder and Yonnet joined

by a saxophonist to set a remarkably languid mood; just one moment among many where minor parts of the album were revealed to possess unanticipated depth. Everyone involved returned to the stage for a massive medley of "As" and "Another Star" to close the album. Wonder teased all the other hit songs he could fit: "Don't You Worry 'Bout a Thing"; "Signed, Sealed, Delivered, I'm Yours"; and Michael Jackson's "The Way You Make Me Feel" before settling on get-down singalong "Superstition." Approaching midnight, Wonder nearly had to be dragged offstage. What's amazing? That so much music can come from one man.

BOB DYLAN Shadows in the Night (Columbia)

Despite his late entry in the standards album game, Bob Dylan actually proposed such an endeavor 35 years ago in the wake of Willie Nelson's Stardust. Then-CBS Records president Walter Yetnikoff refused to pay for it. A questionable business decision, but



one that probably saved Dylan's take on the so-called "saloon songs" of Frank Sinatra from the horrors of Eighties production. AARP tie-in aside, Shadows neatly sidesteps forced pastiche. Eschewing obvious orchestral or piano accompaniments, Dylan recorded these 10 songs live in the echoing environs of Capitol Studios with members of his touring band, including local guitar hero Charlie Sexton. Sparse but thoughtful arrangements alternately dominated by steel guitar and plaintive horns complement Dylan's characteristic vocal delivery in twilight. Between its wistful pulse and Donnie Herron's gorgeous pedal steel lead, "Full Moon and Empty Arms" nods to the confluence of country and Hawaiian music. Aside from Rodgers & Hammerstein's "Some Enchanted Evening," which can't help being undone by the ubiguity of both singer and song, there's not a dud in the bunch. The real treat in hearing Dylan rework tunes like "Autumn Leaves" is a slow-motion, humanistic view of how he finds the song's critical path. THE DECEMBERISTS What a Terrible World, What a Beautiful World (Capitol)

Indie rock fanatics and tastemakers have gotten so used to Portland's Decemberists having a narrative concept (The Crane Wife. The Hazards of Love), or trying to prove something (the "We're not a

prog band - really!" songcraft of The King Is Dead) that an album as straightforward as What a Terrible World, What a Beautiful World feels underwhelming. Put aside expectations of grandeur, however, and Colin Meloy's musical and thematic obsessions reward handsomely. The lustful "Philomena" emulates Sixties girl-group pop, while the melancholic "Make You Better" and "Cavalry Captain" find the band pursuing indie pop at its most melodic. "Lake Song" pursues Nick Drake under a pink moon, while "Carolina Low" and "Better Not Wake the Baby" evoke folk of a less specific but more timeless nature. "Anti-Summersong" and the resigned, painfully meta "The Singer Addresses His Audience" touch on one of Meloy's pet themes: the relationship between artists and their consumers. What a Terrible World, What a Beautiful World isn't a concept LP or any kind of statement of higher purpose. Instead, it simply illuminates the Decemberists' inviolate strengths. – Michael Toland ****

SLEATER-KINNEY No Cities to Love (Sub Pop) Layoff spurred no staleness in

the newly regrouped Sleater-Kinney. The Olympia-born trio's first LP in a decade sounds as brazen as ever. Coupling punk rock sass with unbridled passion, the Portlanders' eighth album commences on a



relatable blue-collar note, as fraught-rock opener "Price Tag" chronicles a kids-carting mother's penny-pinching plight while grocery shopping: "They reach for the good stuff/ Let's stay off the label/ Just 'til we're able." In 32 minutes, the pioneering Nineties riot grrrls still exude that movement's ethos - with an expressive and empowering spirit: "No outline will ever hold us," assures Corin Tucker in "A New Wave," later adding, "I am raw material." During S-K's decade hiatus, Tucker raised two kids, drummer Janet Weiss joined Stephen Malkmus & the Jicks, and guitarist Carrie Brownstein launched short-lived band Wild Flag and co-created enduring sketch comedy series Portlandia. Its recording kept under wraps for nearly two years, the Oregonians' confident comeback is balls-out bold, the threepiece returning with fresh vitality. "Bury Our Friends" encapsulates the women's second coming: "My body has no need for sleep this time around." (Sleater-Kinney razes Stubb's April 17)

Rain (1932) CLASSIC DRAMA (SOUTH) LITERATURE (NORTH)

This pre-Code golden shower of sopping depravity and creepy religiosity is a doozy, even if star Joan Crawford hated it. Adapted from Somerset Maugham, Crawford plays a morally conflicted prostitute stranded in monsoon-season Pago Pago with an impotent missionary (Walter Huston), plenty of rum, and the increasingly nightmarish patter of raindrops on a forest of palm fronds. Says Crawford to Huston: "Oh, no. Mr. Davidson. Your God and me could never be shipmates." Hallelujah! - Marc Savlov

I Know Where I'm Going! (1945) **DIRECTOR'S WALL (POWELL)**

Buckets of rain be damned, this Powell & Pressburger picture is a sunny romancer about a pragmatic young woman on her way to a loveless but lucrative marriage on a remote Scottish isle. Gale storms keep her stuck on the mainland. where she meets a charming naval officer at home on leave. They trade barbs in wet weather, then dry off just in time to swap longing looks. It's perfection. - Kimberley Jones

In the Mood for Love (2000) HONG KONG (WONG KAR-WAI)

In Wong Kar-wai's intoxicating, bittersweet love story of two neighbors whose spouses are having an affair with each other, it seems to rain at the most inopportune moments. Maggie Cheung and Tony Leung slowly circle each other in the stifling society of 1962 Hong Kong, their partners' infidelity bringing them together. This is Wong firing on all cylinders, with lush cinematography, a gorgeous soundtrack, and a heartbreaking story you can't turn away from. - Josh Kupecki

MOHAWK, SATURDAY 11

"It's not a sensitive subject at all," X colead vocalist/bassist John Doe demurs, addressing the last time the L.A. punk rock institution played Austin: March 13, 2014. Fifteen minutes into their SXSW showcase, as X stormed into their 1980 classic "Johnny Hit and Run Paulene," Rashad Owens breached a crash barrier on Red River Street and barreled into a big crowd. Four died; 21 were injured. Owens was charged with capital murder and multiple counts of aggravated assault.

"I was busy playing," Doe continues. "It was horrible. I'm glad we're coming back to the same place in some way. I'm not one of those people that's gonna say, 'Yeah, man. I was there. It was really fucked up.' I wasn't there. We were in the middle of playing, and it was a tragedy. But we had no idea anything had happened. By the time we were done, it was all cleaned up, as it should be. "It was strange to be that close to it, but not be aware of it. I don't know what the cops were thinking, chasing this guy. But it's what happened."

Meanwhile, X's return sees them trying a different sonic format. Michael Kilpatrick's now in to play acoustic guitar and drums. Billy Zoom, the band's lead guitarist, will grab the saxophone for a couple of songs. And

drummer D.J. Bonebrake adds vibes on another three or four. "We get to do some songs we

either never played or played very rarely," says Doe. "It's like a whole different thing. It's cool."

As for SXSW, Doe has his own suggestion.

"They should hold it in August," he laughs. "That way, it would only be the people there for the music, because everyone would be sweating their asses off." – *Tim Stegall*

EX HEX Red 7, Friday 10

Ex Hex's ladies demolish a different Austin stage every time they roll through town. Debuting at a free Waterloo smash in March 2014, the D.C. trio slayed with just a handful of rock & roll anthems from frontwoman Mary Timony's tackle box of blistering riffs. At Mohawk in January, they summoned a literal downpour with thundering LP Rips. – Nina Hernandez

JEREMY GALINDO & CHRIS KING Swan Dive, Friday 10

This Will Destroy You toured hard on the back of last year's opus Another Language, collecting frequent flyer miles from all over the world. As the band preps its Levitation showcase, its frontmen take over, taking a breather from the road and clearing the decks for the quartet's next phase. McAllen fellow travelers They Mean Us, Ft. Worth/Denton indie math rockers Cleanup, and Austin power trio Pelicrane join the fun. - *Michael Toland*

AIMEE MANN & BILLY COLLINS Paramount Theatre, Friday 10

After a musical courtship with rocker Ted Leo resulted in successful power-pop duo the Both, Aimee Mann continues the effort to expand the parameters of her performance. This time the Grammy- and Oscarnominated singer-songwriter invites poet Billy Collins to share the stage. Collins claims similar recognition in the poetry world; he's a former U.S. Poet Laureate, a Guggenheim Fellow, and the first recipient of the Mark Twain Award for Humor in Poetry by the Poetry Foundation. – *Jim Caligiuri*

THE ITALS Flamingo Cantina, Saturday 11

The faces have changed, but the sentiment remains the same: For the Itals, a band Keith Richards once considered "the pinnacle of how reggae can sound," the Rasta Philosophy continues to pervade. Charter member Keith Porter still fronts the group, which includes children Darien and Kada now that fellow originators Lloyd Ricketts and Ronnie Davis have left. With nothing new since 2009, expect loads of the pioneering troupe's hits: "In a Dis Ya Time," "Jah Calling," and more of that old-time Cool and Dread. - Chase Hoffberger

FUSEBOX MUSIC The Off Center, Friday 10- Sunday 12

A wonderful and whimsical citywide celebration of the creative arts. Fusebox Festival spills into a second week with more music cued up. "Baroquely unclassifiable" composer and singer-songwriter Corey Dargel fronts a fivepiece ensemble tackling themes of depression in a live rendering of his latest album, OK It's Not OK (Friday 10, North Door). Jeremy Ylvisaker, who has worked with everyone from Andrew Bird to Eyedea & Abilities, leads his band Alpha Consumer to craft the score for Strip Tease, a work by choreographer Chris Schlichting that "embraces and slyly subverts dance history" (Friday 10-Sunday 12, Salvage Vanguard Theater). Heather Kravas' A Quartet explores the possibility and politics of social dance set to a score by NYC composer Dana Wachs (Saturday 11 & Sunday 12, Rollins Studio Theatre, the Long Center). Arrive early to honk harmoniously as part of the 80-car ensemble of Traffic Jam (Saturday 11. Blue Starlite Drive-In) and get intergalactic with the Ziggy Stardust meets Big Freedia bounce of New Orleans avantass-shaker Vockah Redu. - Thomas Fawcett

YONDER MOUNTAIN STRING BAND, BEN SOLLEE

Stubb's, Saturday 11 The departure of founding member/ mandolin player Jeff Austin requires that Colorado's Yonder Mountain String Band soldier on in unexpected ways. The remaining trio, Dave Johnston, Ben Kaufmann and Adam Aijala, add violinist Allie Kral and mandolin hot shot Jacob Jolliff to continue their exploration of what bluegrass can be. With a new disc, Black Sheep, coming in June, expect something new yet daring. Innovative cellist and singer-songwriter Ben Sollee is an excellent reason to get to this one early. – Jim Caligiuri

LONGHORN JAZZ FESTIVAL: JEFF "TAIN" WATTS & THE UT JAZZ ORCHESTRA UT'S Bates Recital Hall, Saturday 11

Decades ago, legendary jazz drummer Max Roach revealed that Jeff "Tain" Watts was among the most incredible drummers playing. Watts has long since cemented his reputation as not only the finest drummer of his generation but one of the finest jazz drummers ever. The six-time Grammy winner has played with Wynton and Branford Marsalis, McCoy Tyner, and Michael Brecker, to name only a few. A fine composer as well, Watts should give UT Jazz Orchestra a run for its money. – Jay Trachtenberg

THE MOB Red 7, Saturday 11

Having split the difference between Joy Division's bleaker-than-bleak mood swings and Crass' war torn righteousness, British peace punks the Mob crafted a masterful album with 1983's *Let the Tribe Increase*, in which their lyrical imagery was so potent it didn't need to be screamed – only moaned over atmospheric military marches. The trio existed from 1979 until 1983, disbanding for 28 years before regenerating with original membership and storming Austin for Chaos in Tejas 2012. – *Kevin Curtin*

LILA DOWNS Long Center, Sunday 12

The daughter of an indigenous Mexican cabaret singer and American professor, Grammy award winner Lila Downs grew up in both Oaxaca and Minnesota. She's spent her career celebrating the rich tapestry of Mexican music, breathing life into mariachi, corridos, and ranchera with lush orchestration and a beautiful operatic voice. As the title suggests, new LP Balas v Chocolate is both sweet and deadly.
