





CHRONICLE NEEDS HEALTH WRITERS

I have for years been disappointed that the AC doesn't seem to feel that health issues are newsworthy. INJURED WORKERS DESERVE BETTER

Dear Editor.

The basis for "The Hightower Report: Corporate Weasels Try to Escape Paying for Workers' Injuries," April 24, was a factually incorrect Mother Jones "article." Readers who like to do their own research are welcome to visit our website (www.arawc.org/blog) and read a pointby-point refutation.

What ARAWC believes should be discussed is how to best care for injured workers in a way that makes sense for the employee and the employer. The goal of any occupational injury benefit plan should be to expedite benefits to injured employees, getting them back to work quickly.


It takes an attorney to understand workers' comp benefits or how to access them. On the other hand, an Option - the workers' comp alternative ARAWC advocates for - requires all employees to receive a document that details the exact benefits and process for accessing them, in language understandable by the average worker.

What about the benefit caps mentioned? Workers' comp operates on this "grand bar-

gain" from 100 years ago, which removes all legal liability from an employer. We believe legal exposure forces the employer to have some skin in the game. This accountability results in safer workplaces and more responsiveness to employee injuries. In the extraordinarily rare instance where an employee reaches a medical benefits cap, the Option gives him or her the right to sue and receive funds above the cap to cover medical needs. Workers' comp doesn't do

this. Option-covered employees that miss time from work also routinely receive more lost wage benefits than are paid by workers' comp.

So while Mr. Hightower spends his time bashing job-creating businesses and defending the broken workers' comp system, we will spend our time advocating for a free-market Option alternative, which is just that - an option. Injured workers deserve better outcomes, not baseless hyperbole.

I do, however, expose the shameful greed of corporations (like the ones he fronts for) that use their campaign cash and vast lobbying networks to rig the rules against hard-hit working people. In Texas, which already has the corporate utopia of privatized workers' comp that Evans & Company intend to impose nationwide. fewer than half of the privatized plans offer benefits to seriously injured workers - or even to families of workers killed on the job.]







EADLINES

NO REGULAR CITY Council meeting this week (next is May 7), but the budget cycle has begun staffers presented the financial and budget forecast April 22, and Council digs into the details on May 6. See stories, p.14.

THE PARKS & REC Department announced this week that it would not be able to open all city pools as scheduled on June 5, will enact a staggered schedule and weekly maintenance closings. and will "temporarily" close both Mabel Davis municipal pool and Metz neighborhood pool due to "serious leaks and declined usage." The Parks board, just learning about the closings, caught heat from residents Tuesday night.

STAR FLIGHT NURSE Kristin McLain fell from the hoist of a helicopter and died Monday night as she and two others attempted to rescue an injured woman along the Barton Creek Greenbelt. McLain was 46 and had been a registered nurse on the staff for seven years. The **National Transportation** Safety Board has grounded the involved helicopter and has launched an investigation into the death.

TAX CUTS DIVIDE the Legislature as the House passed a \$4.9 billion tax cut plan on April 28, comprising a business franchise reduction and the first-ever state sales tax cut. Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick threatens to block budget negotiations if they don't raise homestead exemptions on property taxes, increasing the specter of a special session.

AISD STAFF ARE asking for a 5% raise. Teachers union **Education Austin** led a rally April 27 at AISD headquarters calling for an across-the-board raise for all staff. The district is currently considering a 1.5% increase, with an additional 1.5% for more experienced staff.

A RAISE COULD help as teachers' health care is costing educators more, according to a new study by school union **Texas AFT**. As the state covers less of the premiums, teachers find themselves shouldering more of the costs, and are increasingly delaying treatment.

ROBERT PRUETT'S TUESDAY execution was staved just hours before he hit the gurney when state district Judge Bert Richardson ordered a stay to allow for **DNA testing**. Pruett was serving a life sentence in prison when he was convicted in 1999 of killing a prison guard at the McConnell Unit in Bee County with a homemade knife. But guestions have since arisen over Pruett's involvement in the murder, and DNA testing has never been conducted on the tape that covered the knife's handle.

U.S. SEN. BERNIE SANDERS, I-Vermont, plans to announce a Democratic presidential bid on Thursday. Running on an **anti-Wall Street** and procampaign finance reform platform, the self-described socialist will make an interesting foil to Hillary Clinton, who recently announced her own run.



Know Thyselves

ZANDAN POLL A SNAPSHOT OF CENTRAL TEXANS' PREOCCUPATIONS

I'm coming a bit late to the annual party on the local Zandan Poll, the survey sponsored by Peter Zandan of the worldwide public relations firm Hill+Knowlton

Strategies, released April 16. Called "Voices of the Austin Community," the poll results are based on a March online survey of more than 800 "Austinites," selected to reflect the demographics of the city - or more accurately, the "Austin" that is defined by residents of Travis, Williamson, Hays, Bastrop, and Caldwell Counties. "Austin" is a fair community defini-

tion for that region, but the geographic ratios also color greatly what the respondents say about the city that is, in actual fact, Austin - and the relative influence the various areas have on the issues and problems the survey addresses.

Ninety-three percent of respondents say they live in one of the first three counties; 58% live in Travis, only 48% within city limits. Within those parameters, it makes sense

that a large majority - 82% would identify "traffic, roads. and transportation" as by far the "most important problem facing Austin today." At 50%, a combined answer of "affordability, cost of living, affordable housing, gentrification" was a distant second. (Population growth, more a cause than a symptom, ran third at 24%.) Last year, traffic was ranked highest, by a

nearly identical 80%, but the other numbers have shifted somewhat: in 2014, growth was second at 29%, affordable housing (specifically) 26%, drought 20%. (Drought has faded as a concern this year, to 11%; the spring rains have apparently had some effect.)

That a poll so heavy with commuters would identify "traffic" as their most important concern is not terribly revealing; but it's also worth asking if a group representing more than half out-of-towners can have much salutary effect on the solutions to city traffic problems that they in fact embody. (The demographic context does, however, go a long way to explaining why TxDOT wants to double-deck MoPac over Lady Bird Lake.)

AS YOU DESIRE

Like Harry Potter's Mirror of Erised, a poll tends to say as much about those reading the results as about those who answered the questions. Zandan himself was taken with the fact that Austinites thought of their neighbors as perhaps more "weird." "creative," even "liberal" than they think of themselves (43% self-identify as conservative), and simultaneously "active" and "laid back." He also called attention to the CONTINUED ON P.12





"youthification" of the city - with a higher density of "young millennials" than any other large city in the U.S. That would also explain why respondents (74%) describe Austin as a "haven for millennials" rather than "Boomers," and a better home for singles or childless adults than for families with children.

Mayor Steve Adler was quick to note that a very large majority (79%; 57% of respondents are homeowners) say they support a 20% homestead exemption (which the mayor campaigned on), and nearly as many (69%) support it even if it means higher taxes for "industrial and commercial" properties - that is, for somebody else. The poll didn't ask for odds on enacting the former without the latter corollary - pretty high, would be my guess but there nevertheless remains plenty of abstract enthusiasm for spending more money on roads, on transit, even on incentives for both economic development and "creative industries." The poll wasn't clear on where the money would come from for all those admirable initiatives - but if that had been one of the questions, my guess is the answer would be: from somebody else.

AUSTINITES REMAIN OPTIMISTIC ABOUT OUR TOWN AND ITS FUTURE.

There were certainly a couple of questions that made me a trifle nervous. Question D13, for example, found that just 5% of Austinites get most of their news from print sources. I suppose I should be somewhat comforted that 45% responded "online" to that question – even if it makes my reporting more constricted and my deadlines dramatically shorter.

HAPPY TO BE HERE

Last year, 77% of respondents called Austin the "top city in the U.S." That question wasn't precisely repeated this year, but it's clear that Austinites - especially the youthifiers - remain enthusiastic and optimistic about our town (or region) and its future. They're a bit more vague about the city of Austin's recent political changes and its future - unsurprisingly, since half of them live elsewhere – but it seems apparent that the demographically representative group of people who answer these surveys, and the larger but quite unrepresentative group who most persistently vote in our municipal elections, are not the same folks.

That's one more weird disjunction in a community that prides itself on its weirdness. If we could somehow arrange a meeting of the minds between the residents who believe Austin hung the moon and the voters who believe the whole town's going to hell in a handbasket - perhaps together we could figure out a way to cure traffic congestion and make housing affordable once again. In another decade or so, we'll learn if those happy millennials have gotten any closer to finding the answers.





City Budget: First Forecast

process, but last Wednesday, April 22, city budget staff presented to City Council the city's five-year financial forecast, with an emphasis on the anticipated budget for Fiscal Year 2016 (beginning Oct. 1). The staff presentation was preceded by economic consultant Jon Hockenyos' generally upbeat report, slightly less so than recent years if only because Austin's recent economic performance has been so positive there's some cyclical presumption that the good times can't last forever. The five-year budget forecast echoed Hockenvos' report specifically for city finances in more bureaucratic terms, noting, "Continued structural financial stability is forecasted through FY 2019-20."

That doesn't mean everything remains the same: Austin continues to grow rapidly, property values continue to rise just as quickly, and the city's structural "cost drivers" - staff growth, wages, health care, other expenses - put pressure on the city's revenues, primarily from property and sales taxes, supplemented by utility income. Although these are very preliminary numbers, the budget staff estimates the **median** home value will rise to \$221,086 (from \$202,254, or up roughly 9%), and the property tax rate estimates are based on that median value home. For its initial forecast. staff is estimating a property tax rate of 47.59 cents per \$100 assessed value; presuming Council eventually concurs, that would be a half-cent lower than FY 2015, but would mean (for the median homeowner) a \$6.63 per month increase (\$79.56 annual). Utility and other fees are also expected to

It's still very early in the city's budget rise, giving a combined property tax and fee increase of \$18.11 per month, or \$217.32 a year (see box).

> Property taxes represent about 42% of the city's revenues; staff is also expecting sales tax income (23% of revenues) to rise 5% over

> Again, all these numbers are forecast estimates - the final budgeted numbers will depend not only on the city's overall economic performance, but also on the ultimate decisions of Council in response to staff recommendations and public input. Those factors are more volatile than in recent years: The new 10-1 Council will be grappling with its first budget, and some members support a 20% homestead exemption on property taxes (roughly a 4% revenue cut, if implemented immediately), and at least a couple have endorsed an "effective" tax rate only (a rate equivalent to last year's income, plus new construction). Any new Council initiatives that would increase costs (e.g., on traffic or permitting) are not yet included in these forecasts.

> Finally, it's important to remember that the city's property tax represents only about 22% of the property owner's tax bill: these forecast numbers do not include other jurisdictions (AISD, Travis County, Central Health), and those numbers are yet to be determined.


> What happens next? Council gave some preliminary feedback to budget staff last week, and are beginning to post questions on the budget web site (www.austintexas. gov/budget). Next week, Wednesday, May 6, Council will hold another work session on the forecast. May and June are devoted to

"stakeholder engagement" - city outreach to the public, and board and commission review of specific budget areas - and the staff recommendation on the homestead exemption will also come due (the state deadline for that decision is June 30).

Through June 5, Austinites can request a "Budget in a Box" - designed to facilitate discussion and response on budget priorities by small or large community groups. It includes "a literature mailer box, instructions, a DVD of the Budget Basics video, discussion materials, and comment cards," with the results of the exercise submitted to the city. COUNCIL: MEET DENIALISM DON

There's no regular City Council meeting this week (next is May 7, agenda still in progress) but the week wasn't entirely lost for civic entertainment. Monday morning featured the last of the scheduled policy reviews - "We made the mistake of calling them 'deep dives," said Mayor Steve Adler, "and there's nothing deep about them at all." Henceforth the "policy conversations" are meant to take place in Council committees - this final one before the dais concerned civic "resilience," broadly defined as community responses to "disruptions": natural disasters, extreme weather events, economic distress, or social crises. Speakers addressed definitions of resilience, anticipated disruptions like floods or wildfires, and methods of economic and social resilience.

The presentations were fairly straightforward, yet sufficiently substantive to provoke District 6 Council Member **Don Zimmerman** to complain about "government bureaucrats." If it weren't for bureaucrats, argued Zimmerman, Northwest Austin residents could solve the wildfire problem themselves by clearing out all the nearby brush - most especially in those impertinent and unnecessary wildlife preserves. And Zimmerman - who regularly delights in reminding his colleagues that he's "an engineer" - directly took on Katherine Hayhoe, Texas Tech climate scientist and director of the university's Climate Science Center. After Hayhoe's elementary but unsurprising account of man-made climate change and its increasing effects on Texas and Texans, Zimmerman informed

her that there is no such thing as climate change - it's all cooked up by government bureaucrats who want to have "the government in charge of climate. It really angers me."

Hayhoe replied that there are free-market solutions (witness Texas' success at wind energy) but apparently that didn't placate Zimmerman, who reportedly continued to press his case to the scientist after her presentation. According to the Austin Monitor, Zimmerman was "loudly criticizing [Hayhoe's] views on climate change until some staff members took her out of the chamber." Hayhoe may be a climate scientist - and she recommended to Zimmerman and his colleagues the site www.skepticalscience.com - but on the dais, Zimmerman is increasingly adopting the role of World's **Foremost Authority**.

Before this amusing kerfuffle, last Wednesday, Council received from staff their initial budget forecast for FY 2016 (see above), and on Thursday managed a bit of regular business. Perhaps the most momentous was the third reading approval of a major residential project on a Burnet Road commercial tract - surprisingly, increasing the potential density from 225 to 300 units, increasing both the overall residential supply in the Burnet Corridor as well as the number of affordable units in the project - all in the interests of "affordability." Voting 7-4, they rejected both a smaller project favored by a nearby neighborhood association and an alternative mixed-use zoning designation proposed on the spot by

District 7 CM Leslie Pool - which would have also required restarting the already several-months-long approval process.

The vote, which might be a one-off or might signal a seachange in Council's approach to residential development, comprised a seemingly unstable alliance among the mayor (who wants more units); Eastside progressives Delia Garza, Pio Renteria, and Greg Casar, promoting affordable housing; joined by property-rights conservatives **Zimmerman** and Ellen Troxclair, and D10's Sheri Gallo, whose arguments echoed the mayor.

Council also:

- Temporarily extended taxi franchise agreements with all the current cab companies, while continuing to work on potential reforms, including at least the possibility of a driv-
- sent the proposed Decker Lake golf project back to committee, where it has languished on life-support since January, and frankly appears doomed;
- referred to committee a \$68,000 art commission for the city's Women and Children's Shelter - despite a strong defense by Adler - after Troxclair, Zimmerman, and Ora Houston took exception to the cost and the entire Art in Public Places Program: Artists, if they work at all, should apparently
- referred to committee the buyout of a flood-damaged home of an elderly homeowner in far Northwest Barrington Oaks -Council was unwilling to make a singular exception, with outstanding buyouts pending elsewhere, especially at Onion Creek.



BUDGET FIGHT ON THE HORIZON, LEADERSHIP SPAT, TMF THWARTS ANTI-CHOICE, AND MORE...

Budget Battle Here! Taxes Fight Over There!

The only thing that lawmakers absolutely have to get done during the legislative session is pass the budget. So inevitably, it becomes the ugliest fight, fought on two battlefields. The melee warmed up last week with both chambers announcing their conferees to walk into a dark, airless room and try to hammer out the myriad of differences between the House draft budget, House Bill 1, and the Senate Committee on Finance's substitute version.


Iiiiin the red corner, the upper chamber dispatched Republican Sens. Jane Nelson, Charles Schwertner, Lois Kolkhorst, and Joan Huffman, with lone Democrat Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, filling out the team.

Iiiiin the other red corner, Republican Reps. John Otto, Trent Ashby, Larry Gonzales, and Sarah Davis, plus Sylvester Turner as the sole Democrat and also the longest serving member of the House Appropriations Committee.

The conflicts have shifted beyond party lines, and are more about how the House and Senate co-exist. There are some outliers, of course. The increasingly marginalized Tea Party House caucus (stewed down to Republicans Jonathan Stickland of Bedford, David Simpson of Longview, and a flexible coterie of grandstanding allies) tried throwing amendments onto the instructions for the House conferees. Stickland seemed particularly chagrined that they were not to discuss tax cuts, so House Appropriations Committee Vice Chair Turner was dispatched to the microphone to patiently explain to him that such matters are not their job. Taxes are handled by Ways & Means, and that's where the real bloodletting will happen.

Tax cuts are coming, that much seems inevitable. However, eternally pugnacious Ways & Means Chair Dennis Bonnen, R-Angleton, is already cracking his knuckles to make sure the House version gets through. He's pushing a 25% cut in the business franchise tax, and a state sales tax





reduction. If taxes are going down, then it's the latter that would have the most direct effect on the poorest Texans (not much, though: Bonnen's plan only proposes a 0.3% cut, from 6.25% to 5.95%).

However, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and the Senate are pushing a 15% franchise cut, raising the exemption from \$1 million to \$4 million, and then raising the homestead exemption on property taxes, benefiting middle-class homeowners. During the budget instructions debate, Bonnen verbally backhanded Stickland and sent a clear message across the rotunda by calling him "Senator Stickland." Now he walks into the inevitable conference committee fights on taxes with a letter signed by nearly 90 Republican state reps backing his plan.



The Redemption of TMF

February was a bleak time for Rep. Trey Martinez Fischer. D-San Antonio. He'd gone from frontrunner and first-round victor in the

race to replace Sen. Leticia Van de Putte, to a run-off loss to fellow Dem Rep. José Menéndez, 59% to 41%. And it probably didn't help relations with the senator-elect that Fischer's campaign slammed him for reaching out to Republicans (i.e., exactly the tactic that Wendy Davis and Van de Putte employed in their respective pursuits of the governorship and lieutenant governorship). Now, however, TMF is making a play for the House's MVP. On April 14, it was Fischer who noted that a com-

puter glitch meant that two of the most controversial pieces of legislation - HB 40, restricting local fracking regulations, and HB 910, the handgun open-carry bill were not eligible for debate (see "Lege Lines," April 17). It was a brief delaying tactic, but a point was made. Then on April 23, anti-choice Republicans tried to tack non-germane abortion restrictions onto HB 2510, the Department of State Health Services' Sunset Bill (see "House Republican Sneaks in Anti-Abortion Amendments," April 24). Yet again, it was Fischer who scuttled their plan, sending it back to committee stripped of the amendments. These may seem like Pyrrhic victories, but it's this kind of grasp of procedural details - the more arcane the better - that has made Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, so influential.

Big Three Blows Up

Coming into the 84th Legislature, the smart money was on Patrick and Gov. Greg Abbott forming an alliance against House Speaker Joe Straus to push a hardline conservative agenda. Of course, that was predicated on 1) Straus being some kind of taxand-spend liberal (he's not) and 2) Patrick

managing to not implode (he hasn't). With tension running high between the two chambers over taxes, open carry, pre-K funding, border security, and a host of other issues, Abbott sent a curt warning that he would veto the budget if there were no franchise tax cuts, which would trigger a special session.

Then it just seemed to be tensions about whose tax plan would win out, until Texas Monthly reported a massive spat when the big three met for breakfast last week, with Patrick demanding that Abbott and Straus stop "picking on me." It seems that the legislative feuds, plus Patrick's grassroots advisory board calling Abbott's pre-K expansion plan "godless," finally boiled over. Now Patrick has told the Houston Chronicle that there is only a 20% chance of a special session. In some quarters, this has been seen as a sign of détente. But considering two months ago there was almost zero prospect of a special, it still seems there's a chance of ruining Abbott's first session or everyone's summer vacation plans.

Short Lines

Texas moved a step closer to police body cameras on April 23 when the Senate voted out SB 158 by Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, creating a uniform policy on their use and a grant for funding (see "Lege Lines," April 17)... Remember the **voter ID** fight of 2011? It's back in the courts, with the Texas NAACP appearing before the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals on April 28 to ask for the state's draconian rules to be thrown out. The U.S. Supreme Court left the law in place for the 2014 elections, but it's still under legal challenge. - Richard Whittaker

House Bill 1800

Dogs are supposed to be a person's best friend. But friendships break down, sometimes even turn violent. Like any friendship, it can be important not to overreact. Especially since, unlike humans, dogs can't call the cops.

Laving out his bill. Rep. Armando Walle. D-Houston, said it originated with residents near the Melrose Civic Club in his district, after the U.S. Postal Service warned them that they may suspend

mail deliveries because there were so many stray dogs attacking their staff. Houston is the No. 1 city in America for dog attacks on postal staff, and Texas has six cities in the top 30, so this is a real problem. The state already has a legal definition of dangerous dogs: Walle's bill creates legal definitions of nuisance and aggressive dogs, as well as other best practices intended to reduce the risks of attack. It also



adds in new microchipping language, so stray dogs that are not aggressive, but simply lost and scared, can be reunited with their owners faster. Houston has already adopted near-identical measures. Walle said, "Combined, these changes will allow local authorities more discretion to target aggressive or stray dogs before they escalate to dangerous levels."

However, speaking against the bill, **Michael White**, director of the Veterinary Public Health Division of Harris County, said the current laws "adequately address aggressive dogs." And he warned that these new definitions would be an unnecessary addition to already overburdened county staff, and would leave them chasing "barking and defecating dogs when they should be working on priority public health threats." Houston lawyer **Zandra Anderson**, who specializes in pet law, argues that the bill is so broadly termed that pretty much any dog can be classified as a nuisance. For example, where the bill says that a law officer may intervene when they think an animal might become a threat, she notes there is no actual definition of "aggressive disposition, so it can mean anything a police officer or animal control officer wants it to mean."

Walle (a dog owner himself) has said that his door is open to working with opponents of the bill, and a committee substitute is in the works.



Guardians Fight On to Save SSLC



In the state Senate gallery, a group of guardians watched intently as the fate of their loved ones hung in the balance - some shed tears as lawmakers waved through a bill that would effectively evict their disabled relatives from the place they call home.

In a 26-5 vote, Senate lawmakers on April 13 approved SB 204, by Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, to direct the closure, by 2017, of the Austin State Supported Living Center - the site of state-based care for roughly 200 residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities - and to establish a commission to decide how many and which of the other 12 state supported living centers should also close.

"I was in tears, most of us were in tears. I wasn't necessarily surprised by the vote, but I was devastated by it," Judy Straughan, the mother of a 45-year-old medically fragile daughter who requires tube feeding, told me. "I was sobbing, other family members were, too. The center serves a vital need for people with profound disabilities," echoed Tammie Parker, legal guardian of her older sister. Jackie, who suffers from severe Down syndrome and has been an Austin SSLC resident since 1958. "My sister has been there all her life. She's happy, she's well cared for. Now we are being forced to rip her apart from that environment."

The shock for guardians was yet another tremor in the process to transition Austin SSLC residents from the longtime center. The legislation is based on last year's **Sunset** Advisory Commission recommendation to close the SSLC. Largely based on cost, Sunset also noted reports of abuse and neglect at the Austin SSLC and others, which elicited Department of Justice oversight in 2009. Families are aware of the DOJ intervention but remain steadfast in supporting the local SSLC. "If our loved ones weren't being cared for we would be first in line to put them somewhere better - they're happy, we're happy. We wish [the lawmakers] would listen to us, the guardians," said Linda Johnson, whose sister Gayla has called the Austin center home for 55 years. Additionally, an on-site evaluation commissioned by the Department of Aging and Disability Services and conducted by the Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Medicine Rural and Community Health Institute found that the DOJ regulatory benchmarks were being impeded by the "lack of consistent" leadership at the Austin SSLC, which has had seven directors in just eight years.

In the meantime, DADS sped up the process by downsizing the center, despite opposition from some family members. Citing high overtime expenditures amid struggling employee recruitment and retention, DADS called for the permanent closures of seven of the SSLC homes by November (see "Evicted and Helpless," Sept. 19, 2014). To date, four of the seven campus cottages have closed their doors. The current population hovers at 210; by this year, DADS hopes to remove 120 more residents. So far, 34 residents have chosen community settings; 27 have transferred to other SSLCs, and 10 others could not make a decision and are in various stages of appeals, according to DADS. Stephen Wallace and Forrest Novy are guardians of two among the 10 battling to remain at the AuSSLC - both families have filed suit, and litigation is still pending or in appeal. "We are not going to give up. There's still a fight to be had," said Wallace.

While advocates of the closure are convinced all residents will be better off in a community or group home setting, guardians of those with deeply debilitating conditions say the level of complex and comprehensive care provided by the SSLC - including specialty medical services, a pharmacy department, and an on-site infirmary – is unmatched in a community setting; placing them in that environment may very well endanger their lives, families persistently argue. Nearly three-fourths of the local residents prefer to stay at an SSLC rather than a community setting, DADS estimates. AuSSLC physicians agree that the patient population is "very complex and very fragile," requiring "significantly more care" than the usual intellectually developmentally delayed individuals, the A&M review noted. And the lack of experience with many underlying causes of IDD often means that "community providers are not prepared to care for this clientele."

Consider Mimi, who has lived at the AuSSLC for more than four decades. The 59-year-old woman needs assistance bathing, prompting for personal care, and often has seizures. "She would not be able to survive well in the community; she would wreak personal havoc," said Mimi's sister and guardian, Sarah Searight. While the legislation includes extra support for a community transition, families say that misses the point. "I would fear for her safety. She requires tremendous amounts of care and services only the SSLC can provide. We are taking her and others away from the sanctuary they've known for so long."

Repeating the arguments of communitybased care groups when directing criticism toward the AuSSLC, Hinojosa made reference to the weak desire of those with IDD to find placement at SSLCs. "We don't have a waiting list of clients that want to join and be admitted to [SSLCs], but we have over 100,000 waiting to be part of community-based services. It's a huge unbalance that we're trying to correct." However, the logic appears faulty when considering the fact DADS has had a moratorium on new admissions to the Austin center since 2012, arguing that it was "in the best interest of residents and staff" to bring the facility down to "a more manageable size."

Furthermore, doubt lingers over whether or not existing SSLCs and community facilities can actually absorb the 200 residents in just two years - a concern expressed by state Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin, who voted against the measure after delivering an impassioned speech on the floor. "We don't even know if the places we're moving them will be identified for closure down the road," said Novy. "Why not pause until we know how to safely take care of those who can't live in the community?"

Many Austin SSLC guardians are now making the Capitol rounds, visiting with representative staffers before the House version of the bill, HB 2699 (still pending in committee) moves forward. While Watson tabled a handful of amendments for lack of support, those could potentially have a better shot in the lower chamber. Suggestions included striking or at least delaying closure; finding an alternative use for the AuSSLC to serve IDD residents; leasing portions of the campus for health care purposes, and combining the AuSSLC and Austin State Hospital operations. - Mary Tuma

Body Cameras for APD, but When?

LIKELY TWO-YEAR TIMELINE BEFORE FULL IMPLEMENTATION

Monday's City Council Public Safety Committee hearing took up, among other things, the topic of body cameras for Austin Police Department officers. It appeared as though all sides were in agreement that body cameras should be implemented; however, there was considerable disagreement about the timeline for implementation and policy details.

The first to speak on the subject was APD Assistant Chief Jason Dusterhoft, who emphasized the complexity of implementation - "we want to do it right," he said. He also discussed the likely benefits and drawbacks of the technology. He said that APD believes the cameras will lead to improved behavior, both for officers and citizens in general, and that video footage will expedite resolutions and provide training material for officers. On the other hand, he explained, use of body cameras raises privacy concerns different from those raised by dash cams. In the course of their work, police enter private homes, interact with victims of and witnesses to crimes, and deal with confidential informants. The cameras could have a chilling effect on people who might not be willing to talk if they knew they were being filmed. Dusterhoft also pointed out that APD is already backlogged with open records requests, which could multiply exponentially with the use of body cameras, especially considering that one incident could generate video footage from several cameras.

Dusterhoft outlined a timeline that, added together, would mean about two more years of work before full APD implementation. He also said that he expects the cost to be about \$7 million over the course of five years, taking into account the initial start-up costs, as well as other costs such as data storage.



Police Monitor Margo Frasier took the podium after Dusterhoft. She noted that the privacy concerns raised by body cameras aren't entirely new - even though dash cams don't go into people's homes, audio from within private residences is sometimes recorded. She also said that there is 'a great need for us to work toward having body cameras"; there are cases she has dealt with as police monitor where there were conflicting accounts and, she said, "I wish I knew what really happened." She warned that the city should not expect the Legislature to fund the implementation of body cameras, even if a bill authorizing a grant, such as SB 158, is passed. She said that when the Lege passed a law requiring dash cams, 60-70% of the state's money went to funding DPS implementation. But she emphasized that APD need not wait

until funding was in place for every officer to have a camera. She said she thought the Downtown entertainment district could be a good place to begin using them, or even testing equipment, because those officers usually don't have dash cams, and it's an area where there's a lot of activity.

Another important policy consideration will be what would trigger a camera to begin recording. Neither Dusterhoft nor Frasier appeared to believe it would be appropriate for the cameras to record an officer's entire shift, but both were aware that clear rules would need to be in place regarding when it would be appropriate for an officer to turn off, pause, or mute a camera.

Debbie Russell of ACLU Texas said that the ACLU had come around on body cameras, and that its recommendations are now similar to those of the Police Executive Research Forum. She highlighted, however, her strong belief that officers should not be allowed to view their camera footage before writing reports, in order to ensure that officers provide honest firsthand accounts, rather than tailoring reports to match video footage.

NAACP Austin President Nelson Linder told the commission that he was bothered by the two-year timeline. "Why can't we fastforward this whole process?" he asked. He said police need to be held accountable now, because "we're talking about lives ... once somebody's killed, we can't bring them back." He argued that more needed to be done than simply adopting body cameras, saying that "we want a uniform [use-of-force] standard," and calling on Council to do more to hold police accountable. In response, Council Member Greg Casar said, "I don't think that anybody thinks this is going to be

a panacea," and later said he was looking into "other initiatives to build legitimacy." Committee Chair Don Zimmerman suggested that one accountability fix could be requiring the police monitor to report directly to Council, to which Linder replied, "I'm for it 1,000 percent." On Tuesday, Linder repeated his call for urgency in an email he sent to Council, saying, "The false notion that somehow you can create another committee to address an issue that requires immediate atten-

tion is reckless and dangerous."

Peaceful Streets Project founder Antonio Buehler, the last of the scheduled speakers, said certain safeguards would need to be in place for body cameras to work, including not allowing police to turn off cameras when interacting with the public; punishing officers for equipment malfunctions; not allowing police to review footage before giving statements; and making sure access to footage is controlled by a third party and made as available to defense attorneys and defendants as it is to the police. He pointed out that in his own case, the media was never given access to the dash cam footage, and argued that if an officer's camera were to malfunction during a use-of-force incident, it should result in automatic dismissal, regardless of whether fault was able to be determined. - Amy Kamp

KLEINERT A FED CASE

Federal District Judge Lee Yeakel ruled this Tuesday, April 28, that the trial of Charles Kleinert, the former APD detective who is charged with the manslaughter of Larry Jackson Jr., will take place in his court, instead of state court.

The motion to remove Kleinert's trial to federal court was brought by his defense, who argued that the case raised a federal question, and so could only be properly heard in federal court. Kleinert claimed that, since he had been deputized to act as a federal officer as part of the **Central Texas Violent** Crime Task Force, he was acting as a federal officer at the time of Jackson's shooting, and would therefore be entitled to argue federal immunity to state prosecution. As Yeakel wrote in his opinion, a determination that Kleinert is able to argue immunity is not the same as saying that argument will prevail: "The issue of whether Kleinert is entitled to federal-officer immunity is an issue for another day. By this order, the court does not reach the merits of the State's indictment nor any defense Kleinert may present in the course of the prosecution."

Yeakel's decision should come as little surprise to those who followed the arguments during the removal hearing – if there was a valid case for keeping the proceedings in state court, it certainly wasn't made by the prosecution. (See "Kleinert a Fed?" April 17.) Although Jackson's family has been opposed to the case going to federal court, Adam Loewy, Jackson's parents' attorney in their civil suit, recently said that he felt confident that the evidence against Kleinert "is so overwhelming" that he would be convicted regardless of where or in which court the trial took place. Among other things, Loewy said that Jackson's colon was torn during his encounter with Kleinert, and that, given the circumstances, such an injury could only have been caused by severe force. - Amy Kamp

HAYS COUNTY WATER WAR CONTINUES

Hays County residents are waiting to see if a lawsuit or legislation will prevent Electro Purification, LLC, from pumping more than 5 million gallons of water a day from a currently unregulated area of the Trinity Aquifer in Hays County. The Houston-based company is contracting to sell the water to Buda and other cities in the sprawling suburbs of Southwest Austin.

The lawsuit, filed by Trinity Edwards **Springs Protection Association**, argues that the Hays Trinity Groundwater Conservation District should have authority over the area. And HB 3405 - one of the bills Rep. Jason Isaac, R-Dripping Springs, filed with the Texas House of Representatives to regulate the EP project – would give authority to regulate the area to the Barton Springs/ **Edwards Aquifer Conservation District** (The bill is currently in Calendars Committee, awaiting a committee hearing.)

EP and TESPA have agreed to have the lawsuit heard by the State Office of Administrative Hearings, which manages contested cases for Texas organizations. TESPA also has in place a pending lawsuit to be able to take action if EP starts drilling more wells without a permit during the hearing process.

The Havs Trinity GCD doesn't possess the equivalent resources nor the scientists for oversight that are available to the BSEACD: placing the regulation of this part of the Trinity Aquifer with BSEACD would enable management of the aquifer on a regional basis, and that makes sense, according to John Dupnik, BSEACD general manager. The Trinity Aquifer and the Edwards Aquifer are interconnected with each other and with the creeks and springs of the region – the Trinity, in many places, provides base flow for the creeks. When the creeks flow downstream they cross into the Edwards, and they recharge that aquifer; pumping from the Trinity where it's shallow can impact creek flow and ultimately affect the Edwards. "It's kind of a tricky thing," said Dupnik. "Our nature is to try to carve it up into little jurisdictions and parcel it out in structured ways. But the reality is, it's one connected system, and to the degree you can manage it holistically, that's ideal."



Dupnik explained that BSEACD would not seek to kill the EP project. "We hope to come in as a voice of reason to apply everything that we've learned in our nearly 30 years of managing aquifers, and let the science drive the decisions." Dupnik acknowledged that there's some concern, especially among EP project developers, that BSEACD's assessment of what the aquifer can yield with minimal effect on the wells in the region may not support what the company has already contracted to provide.

Louie Bond, editor of Texas Parks & Wildlife, lives near the EP well field. She said both conservation districts have been very responsive to the needs of citizen organizers. "In this particular situation, we probably have better resources at Barton Springs," she said. "They could work in conjunction with Hays Trinity to protect that whole section of the Trinity Aquifer."

It's been four months since Hays County citizens learned of the EP project and the potential threat to the community's main source of water. Bond said they're getting tired, but they must continue to be vigilant. "The main thing for us is that we have so much at stake, that we have no choice but to continue fighting until something happens," she said. "No less than the future of the Trinity Aquifer depends on it."

Casar Files for Summary Judgment

On Tuesday, April 28, attorneys for City Council Member Greg Casar filed a motion for summary judgment to dismiss the lawsuit filed by defeated candidate Laura Pressley. Pressley sued after losing the Dec. 16 run-off to Casar, after a Jan. 6 recount confirmed the original result and the **Secretary of State Elections** Division repeatedly rejected her complaints concerning the recount. Pressley claims the recount was illegitimate because it relied upon electronic voting "cast vote records" instead of "ballot images" – though these are defined in election law and in common practice as identical - and also argues other irregularities, including consolidation of poll sites and other recount procedures she considered incorrect or inadequate.

Pressley was deposed by Casar's counsel on April 16, and some of the arguments for dismissal are based on her answers then. The motion makes three main arguments: 1) Pressley's primary claim, regarding "ballot images," is unsupported in state or federal law or in common practice; 2) Pressley's objections to consolidation of the polls were effectively waived when she failed to make them when the run-off was officially organized, and she's been unable to demonstrate that

this standard election practice prevented anyone from voting: 3) even if any of her "scattershot complaints" concerning the outcome have merit, "they fall far short of overcoming her 1,291-vote margin of defeat."

The extended motion is aggressive - it begins by asserting simply, "Pressley refuses to accept her defeat." and repeatedly describes her claims as "frivolous and without merit," arguing that neither the facts of the election nor the law offer any support for those claims.

Presumably, Pressley's attorneys will file a response in due course. The current schedule calls for a May 26 hearing before state District Judge Dan Mills on the motion to dismiss, and - should that fail - a July 20 trial. (Previously, Judge Mills strictly limited the broad range of discovery requested by Pressley, confining it to readily available and relevant records concerning the Dec. 16 election and the run-off, and to specifically identified records - not simply every document or even person having anything to do with Travis County voting procedures.) Before any further hearings. Travis County Clerk Dana DeBeauvoir is scheduled to be deposed by Pressley's counsel on May 11 - whether anyone else will be deposed has not been announced. - Michael King





The Education Session

School finance battle takes Capitol center stage

If there's a poster child for what's best about Texas school kids, she could be Regan Lively. With a slight quaver in her voice, the high school senior from Flower Mound took to the podium at the April 18 Save Texas Schools Rally at the Capitol to tell her story. She has overcome profound dyslexia, and this year was accepted into Oklahoma Christian University, with a \$16,000 scholarship. But unless she graduates, she can't go - and she won't graduate, because she has failed the U.S. History STAAR test. She told the assembled crowd of educators, administrators, trustees, parents, and kids, "As elementary students we are taught to shoot for the moon and reach for the stars, but when the challenge of a test comes across, our anxiety kicks in, and our dreams are shattered right before our eyes."

Students like Lively have also become walking, talking metaphors for what Texas education does wrong. The figures laid out at the rally were stunning, and well-established. Texas has a massive and expanding student population - it grows by 85,000 students annually, equal to adding the entire student body of Rhode Island to Texas schoolrooms in the last decade. Yet, even as Republican politicians boast about the "Texas economic miracle," per-student spending has dropped by roughly 25% since 2009. Specialist resources to help kids with extra needs, like dyslexia, or for the growing number of English language learners, are scarce to extinct. At the same time, the testing regimen has swallowed more and more of classroom time, and more and more of the operational budget. It's a minor miracle anyone graduates.

And the testing anxiety? That's what lawmakers seem to face, every time someone talks about school finance reform. It's too big, too complicated. Put money in one school, you have to take it from another. Yet the 84th Legislature has seen the most serious conversations yet about how - and how much - Texas should pay for its public schools. The question now is, are they doing enough?

This was always going to be an education session, due to a confluence of three factors. First, a new governor: In his inaugural State of the State address, Gov. Greg Abbott declared education a top priority. Second, the 2013 passage of omnibus education reforms in House Bill 5, which brought sweeping changes to exams, graduation requirements, and how the state assesses schools and districts. With changes that broad, lawmakers knew they would be coming back to tweak the system after a couple of years of field testing.

Then there's the third factor: the 2014 ruling by state

District Judge John Dietz that found that the whole Texas school finance system fails to meet its constitutional obligation to provide adequate and equitable funding. Texas' lousy track record on school finance had reached a new low in 2011, when then-Comptroller Susan Combs handed down a budget forecast of gloom and doom, and in a blind panic the Legislature went on a budget-slashing frenzy, cutting \$4 billion out of public education funds for

the 2012-13 biennium. However, because the state also failed to cover the increase in student enrollment or even inflation, schools were really \$5.4 billion in the hole. In 2013, with a slightly rosier financial forecast, the state added \$3.4 billion back. However, that barely covered enrollment growth or inflation, and did nothing to dent the hole they had dug two years earlier.

So 2015 is a perfect storm, a session when education holds center stage. And that's good news for lawmakers like House Public Education Committee Member Rep. Dan Huberty, R-Kingwood. On April 9, over the opposition of the

Tea Party rump, the House passed his HB 4, establishing a \$130 million fund for qualifying schools to help pay for halfday pre-K. Huberty is also sponsoring and shepherding SB 149 by Sen. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, setting up graduation committees that look at more than just test scores. That's exactly the kind of alternate path to graduation that students like Regan Lively - and 20,000 kids across the state just like her - need. "That's got to get done," he said, "so we can help these kids graduate."

Huberty admits the rollout of HB 5's testing reforms was "horrible," and most would agree with him. Yet while there are plenty of fixes to HB 5 still waiting in the wings, the real debate remains focused on money, and the center of attention is HB 1759 by House Public Education Committee Chair Jimmie Don Aycock, R-Killeen. It's the first serious attempt to shift how the state distributes money in more than a decade. Rather than wait for the courts to force his hand, Aycock took the initiative, and many of his fellow reps have his back.

In the House, school finance is a bipartisan issue, and that reflects a larger change. Texans - well, apart from the Tea Party - seem sick of seeing their school districts used as a punching bag. Groups like Save Texas Schools are gaining traction, while the pro-public ed Texas Parent PAC has become one of the most effective endorsers in primaries on both sides of the aisle. Louis Malfaro, president of Texas AFT, noted the teachers' union is just about to charter its latest affiliate in Waco. "We're growing across the state," he said, arguing that that indicates a strengthening of resolve. Even lawmakers are turning the tide. Malfaro cited the speech by Clarksville Republican Rep. Gary VanDeaver at the Save Texas Schools rally: "He said, 'I was a teacher and a superintendent, and gosh, I didn't know how bad our schools were until I got to Austin."

So HB 1759 has powered through the House. But just because school finance is a bipartisan issue, that does not mean it's bicameral. Center for Public Policy Priorities policy analyst Chandra Kring Villanueva notes that while the House has shown real determination, "the Senate has shown no intention to deal with school finance. ... It's a onesided arrangement."

The Legislature is a simple place, and historically there's good reason why they called the Senate the upper chamber. That was traditionally the place where bad ideas, many of which originated in the hurdy-gurdy madness of the House, went to die. Now, with Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick in charge, and barn-burning radicals like New Braunfels Republican Sen. Donna Campbell at his back, all that's gone out the wood-

blinded windows of the Senate chamber. As Malfaro puts it, "The House is in touch with reality, and the Senate is in the USS Koch Brothers, orbiting planet ALEC" - referring to the American Legislative Exchange Council, the corporate-funded conservative bill-mill.

Not that the Republican-dominated House has morphed into tax-and-spend liberals. The House and the Senate are locked in a fight over tax cuts: The

lower chamber wants a mix of business margins franchise and sales tax cuts, while their colleagues across the Dome are eyeing franchise and property tax cuts. How can they pay for this? By using part of a supposed \$8 billion surplus - a surplus created by years of slashing school spending. House Appropriations Committee veteran Rep. Dawnna Dukes, D-Austin, said, "Cost, growth, and inflation have historically been ignored in state budgets. We now see it is designed to provide cuts, not to properly consider the greater and ignored needs of Texas."

LEGE GOES TO SCHOOL: EDUCATION BILLS

Taxes, finance, vouchers, graduation paths, "parent triggers," and community schools: Lawmakers have filed a broad slate of education bills, some of which fix what they've earlier broken, some of which make meaningful reforms, and some of which will just cause more damage to be fixed later. Here's a sample platter of what's in progress in the 84th Legislature.

SENATE BILL 4, by Senate Public Education Committee Chair **Larry Taylor**, R-Friendswood: The Senate's omnibus vouchers bill has become a hollow shell of itself. Taylor's original language included "education tuition grants" (aka vouchers) and tax credits for businesses that donate to scholarship funds for private schools. When it emerged from committee, the vouchers were gone, and the tax credit language had nearly doubled in length. It moved slowly through the Senate, and faces a rough future in the House.

HOUSE BILL 1759, by House Public Education Committee Chair **Jimmie Don Aycock**, R-Killeen: The House omnibus school finance reform bill is one of the most sweeping reforms since the 2006 court-mandated overhaul. Primarily, it gets rid of outmoded adjusters for how cash is allocated, some of which the author has described as being so poorly representative of modern education spending that they are "indefensible." However, he admits his proposal is only a short-term fix: With no changes to the underlying weights for allocation, his plan only keeps the lights on through 2017.

HB 4, by Rep. **Dan Huberty**, R-Kingwood: Access to pre-K education is one of the great indicators of student achievements throughout their education careers, making it all the more unfortunate that pre-K funding was one of the first targets in the 2011 financial bloodbath. By replacing \$130 million of the \$300 million lost four years ago, HB 4 would partially fund half-day pre-K for eligible districts. However, the Tea Party has set its cap against the plan, calling it "godless."

SB 6, by **Taylor**: In 2013, the reforms in HB 5 changed school accountability rankings from four levels (exemplary, recognized, academically acceptable, and academically unacceptable) to two (met standard and improvement required). Taylor's bill moves campuses to the same A-F standard currently used for districts and students. Primarily supported by the business community – which would never subject itself to a similar ranking system.

SB 893, by Sen. **Kel Seliger**, R-Amarillo: would move teachers away from five-year professional appraisals, and instead tie salary, promotion, and career development to student test scores. The fact the Legislature would do this as it is trying to reduce the impact and importance of high stakes testing for student graduation seems self-contradicting. The Senate version was heavily re-written in committee, placing less emphasis on tests and giving school boards far more leeway on setting benchmarks. Sen. **Konni Burton**, R-Colleyville, went so far as to say the original was "poorly written," it is stuck in committee, and it seems unlikely the lower chamber will be more receptive to the Senate version, no matter how heavily amended.

SB 14, by **Taylor**: Texas already has a parental trigger bill, allowing parents to effectively hand their local campus over to charter groups after five years of low performance. However, virtually no one has ever used it, so Taylor's measure proposes cutting that five years to two – good news for reformers with itchy trigger fingers. It's out of the Senate. so the guestion now is whether the House wants to touch it.

SB 149, by **Seliger**: One of the important fixes to HB 5, Seliger's measure would create graduation committees, meaning graduating students could be evaluated on the totality of their academic performance, not just on how they did on their **STAAR** end-of-course tests. Currently cruising to passage with near-universal House and Senate support, it provided one of the session's most entertaining moments, when House sponsor Huberty, virtually shaking with anger, publicly chastised Texas Association of Business CEO **Bill Hammond** and Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce Vice President **Drew Scheberle** for opposing a bill he said they clearly didn't understand.

HB 1891, by Rep. **Eddie Rodriguez**, D-Austin: The polar opposite of a parent trigger bill, HB 1891 creates a legal definition of a community school: a campus that partners with community-based groups to provide wraparound health, social, and academic services to help students succeed, as an alternative to closure. So far, it and its Senate counterpart (SB 1483 by Sen. **Sylvia Garcia**, D-Palito Blanco) have faced an uphill struggle, even with some Democrats. But as community schools advocates have made their case in committee hearings, the antipathy of lawmakers like Sen. **Royce West**, D-Dallas, has started to soften.

SB 391, by **Burton**: aka the "Tim Tebow" bill, a long-pushed pet project of the home-schooling movement, to allow home-schooled kids to compete in University Interscholastic League sports. Similar language passed the Senate but died in the House last session, and neither Burton's version, nor similar language in the House by Rep. **Harold Dutton**, D-Houston, or Rep. **Leighton Schubert**, R-Caldwell have made it to a committee hearing.

SB 669, by **West**: That rare beast in Texas: a Democrat-authored bill that educators loathe. West's measure would create the **Texas Opportunity School District**, a statewide ISD effectively run by the Commissioner of Education, into which troubled schools can be transferred after two years of low scores. Since state micromanaging of campuses doesn't exactly have a stellar track record, it's no surprise this bill is getting little traction. Neither it, nor its House companion by Dutton, nor a Republican version drafted by Taylor, is having much luck getting out of committee.

SCHOOL FINANCE: A TIMELINE

1854: Texas lawmakers establish system of free ("adequate" and "equitable") Texas public schools, under state constitution.

1973: The U.S. Supreme Court rules (San Antonio ISD v. Rodriguez) that education is not a Constitutionally protected right, meaning that school finance is an issue for states, not federal

1984: The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund, on behalf of Edgewood ISD, sues the State of Texas, on the grounds that the school funding system violates the Texas Constitution.

1989: After years of appeals, the **Texas Supreme Court** rules for Edgewood, and instructs the state to reform its finance system.

1990: Lawmakers pass Senate Bill 1, a series of sales, tobacco, and alcohol tax increases to provide more school cash. State District Judge Scott McCown rules the changes unconstitutional.

1993: Lawmakers pass the "Robin Hood" system. limiting ISDs to a maximum \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed property value for maintenance and operations payments. Richer districts find themselves subject to "recapture" - sending a portion of their property taxes to state coffers, to help finance poorer districts.

2004: In West Orange Cove v. Texas, more than 300 school districts file suit against Texas over equity and adequacy of the school finance system. Judge John Dietz rules for the schools.

2005: Texas Supreme Court upholds Dietz's ruling, because so many districts are setting the maximum \$1.50 rate just to cover basic operations, and the 1993 reforms created a de facto, and unconstitutional, statewide property tax. Gov. Rick Perry calls the first in a series of special sessions.

2006: Lawmakers lower the property tax limit, and plan to make up the difference with between an increase in cigarette taxes and a reform of the business margins franchise tax.

2011: With the franchise tax dramatically underperforming, lawmakers cut \$4 billion from the school finance budget. With no extra money to cover inflation and increased student population, this leaves a \$5.4 billion hole. Texas **Taxpayer and Student Fairness Coalition** and other groups file suit against Texas, again citing lack of adequacy and equity.

2013: Dietz issues initial ruling in *Texas* Taxpayers & Student Fairness Coalition v. Williams, et al., calling the current system unconstitutional, but giving the Legislature time to fix the system before passing his final ruling. Lawmakers restore \$3.6 billion to school finance budget – at least \$2 billion less than needed.

2014: Dietz's final written ruling is that, even with more cash, the system is still unconstitutional. State files appeal with Texas Supreme Court, still pending.

But at least the House leadership is trying. The Senate seems to have no interest in Aycock's structural reforms, or Huberty's pre-K investment, and instead is pushing hard on vouchers and tax breaks for businesses handing money to private schools.


Even their core education budgets diverge by billions. HB 1, the House draft budget, proposes an extra \$2.2 billion for inflation and population growth, the Senate version a billion less. And then there's Aycock's bill, with an extra \$800 million hidden up its sleeve.

BAND-AID ON A HEMORRHAGE

If HB 1759 passes, few districts will see more benefit than AISD. Board President Gina Hinojosa explained: "There's no district in the state that exemplifies how broken the school finance system is than Austin." Like Villanueva at the CPPP, she praised Aycock for starting the debate. "I love his quote about, rather than pay the lawyers, let's do what's right for the chil-

What HB 1759 changes is not just how much money there is, but how the money is distributed. The changes are limited: Aycock himself has said this is a two-year fix, and lawmakers need to come back in 2017 to tackle "weights" Texas uses to adjust the basic allotment for higher-needs students. For example, the bill would get rid of the Cost of Education Index, a fudge factor designed to reflect the comparative cost of educating in an expensive city. However, the equations haven't been updated since 1991. Edna Butts, the district's director of Intergovernmental Relations & Policy Oversight, said, "AISD has the same CEI as Killeen, and we're less than Round Rock. If Austin was rated the same as Houston, we'd get \$13 million more."

Among a slate of tweaks, Aycock's plan would simply kill the CEI and put the cash in the basic allotment, which benefits AISD. Similarly, the district would finally get state assistance on transportation costs. So in raw numbers, what would this mean for AISD? Butts explained, "We have three different scenarios out there. We have House Bill 1 passed by the House, we have the committee substitute to House Bill 1 passed by the Senate, and neither factor in Aycock's bill quite yet." If the House version passes, then AISD gets another \$19 million a year in its basic allotment. If the Senate wins out, then it's \$10 million. But if HB 1759 passes, that means \$48 million a year over the biennium for AISD.

Not everyone is happy with that shift. The Equity Center is one of the core groups involved in the current litigation, and its executive director, Wayne Pierce, is among the growing crowd that applauds Aycock for starting the discussion. However, that doesn't mean that he's happy with HB 1759; he argues that it does more for wealthy districts than poor ones. That's why he's critical of steps like eliminating the CEI, which he claims needs fixing, not killing. Pierce said, "They're putting the money in the right place. On the other hand, they're taking it from the wrong place."

The biggest hidden benefit for wealthier districts would be in recapture, aka the notorious "Robin Hood" system, whereby property-rich districts like Austin send a portion of their taxes to the state to fund poorer districts. AISD is the biggest single contributor, paying 11% of the statewide total collected, and Travis is the biggest contributing county. HB 1759 doesn't change that status, but it would mean some relief. Rather than the \$228 million recapture AISD forecasts for 2017, it would be closer to \$180 million - still bad, but not crippling. However, with the Legislature known for its volatility, Butts isn't cutting checks yet. She said, "We haven't done new plans based on Aycock's bill yet. We don't want to iinx it."

This sounds promising, but then it also sounds horribly familiar. There's a cycle in Texas politics. Lawmakers create a system. They get sued over it. After years of appeals, they lose. They come up with another system, or at least some serious tweaks. They get sued over it, and so on, and so forth (see timeline below). It's a 40-year cycle - less trial-and-error than trial and trial date. Huberty said, "School finance has always been, we put a Band-Aid on it, to fix one problem and then, oh, geez, we've got another problem."

Even Austin Mayor Steve Adler has been in those trenches. In 1997, he was chief of staff to then-Sen. Eliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso, fighting to get changes made to the weighting system. First set in 1982, after 15 years the weights were completely out of line with the actual costs of educating special needs kids and English language learn-

ers. But reformers failed to achieve any changes, and those same weights remain in place - that's 33 years of changes in educational theory, practice, and realities that Texas school finance ignores. As mayor, Adler sees school finance another way: The biggest chunk of local property taxes goes to school districts, so high ISD tax rates have a direct effect on affordability. Adler said, "There's only a shift in education funding when one of two things happens. The first is a court rules and mandates a change. The second is when the business community gets together and says that, for the economic well-being of their businesses in the state, things need to change."

This time, Texas has both factors working, with the Dietz ruling, and a broad coalition of industries, spearheaded by the normally anti-tax Texas Association of Business, calling on Gov. Abbott to abandon tax cuts in favor of education and infrastructure investment. That bodes well for Adler, who said, "We're only as strong as the court backing that we have, and our allies in the business community."

Another reality check: Any of this can change in an instant. While Huberty remains optimistic the Senate will play ball, Patrick has expressed little interest in filling the billion-dollar void between his and the House's plans. Aycock has even warned that, if HB 1759 passes without the \$3 billion it needs to work, he will ask Abbott to veto it.

And there's a deeper question: Is this a real fix, or is this just another spin on the legislate/litigate merry-go-round? Aycock has been explicit that this is a two-year Band-Aid before the surgery begins. The CPPP's Villanueva argues that Aycock's \$3 billion is a fraction of the \$6 billion to \$8 billion that public schools need right now, and then that the new basic allotment needs to become inflation- and poverty-linked. Moreover, she notes, the problems with the franchise tax that the Legislature is trying to fox through cuts came about from a 2006 revision intended to put more money into - you guessed it - school finance. She said, "If we get rid of this revenue stream, we just have to replace it with another, and we become more dependent on sales tax or property tax."

Will HB 1759 even be enough to placate the courts? Pierce of the Equity Center thinks not. First, even if it passes, and the full \$3 billion is injected, it will still barely touch the lowest definition of adequacy. Pierce said, "The Constitution is not what we need for public education. It's the least that we do for public education." But he's realistic about the size of the task, adding, "We have a severely inefficient funding system, and I don't think you can fix it all in one session." Until the state adds real money to replace property taxes, and tackles the weights, Pierce said, it's all triage. "It's like we have a dog who has mange, and we're trying to fix it by putting salve on the tail."

California Law: A jury in Atascadero, Calif., having already convicted Mark Andrews, 51, of murder, concluded in March that he was legally sane at the time he shot his neighbor to death even though he claimed she was a vampire and that he himself had been, for 20 years, a werewolf. (A month later, a judge in San Francisco acquitted Santino Aviles, 41, of robbery and other felony charges after he claimed that the apartment he broke into was a spaceship that would take him to safety before the imminent explosion of the Earth. His lawyer called his condition a "meth-fueled psychosis," and he was convicted only of misdemeanors.)

World's Worst Sculptor

It seemed like a good idea when the town of Celoron, N.Y., agreed in 2009 to pay for a bronze statue honoring the village's only celebrity. Lucille Ball had spent her childhood years there, and even today, everyone loves Lucy. The result was apparently a monstrosity, described in news reports as "frightening" and unrecognizable by anyone who had ever watched Lucy's TV shows or movies. The original sculptor first suggested a fee of \$8,000 to \$10,000 to make a better one, but after Mayor Scott Schrecengost started a fundraising campaign, the sculptor offered to make another one for free.

Wait, What?

Tough Love: A Catholic priest (unnamed in news reports) in Taranto, Italy, was removed recently after reports that, while attempting to minister to an unemployed laborer, he arranged for online role-playing in which the man was Judas and the priest dispatched him to gay orgies to be punished (for betraying Jesus) by members of the Vatican security force.

Paulo Silva, 51, facing bestiality charges in April in Framingham (Mass.) District Court, insisted that the charges be reduced to only attempted larceny. Yes, he was caught fondling the male purebred pit bull, but he had no sexual motivation, his lawyer explained. Actually, he said a friend of Silva's owned a female pit bull and Silva had asked the male's owner if the two dogs could mate, but when the owner declined, Silva said he was simply trying to collect the sperm himself. Judge Jennifer Stark was unmoved and set the case for trial.

Leading Economic Indicators

In additional fallout from the budget cuts and personnel reductions at the IRS, the supervisory revenue official for the Dallas region disclosed in April that his office had so few collectors that it would pursue only scofflaws who owe the government at least \$1 million. "I have to say," the supervisor told a reporter, "nobody's ever going to knock on [the] door" of anyone who owes from \$100,000 to \$999,999.

Unclear on the Concept

At Australia's sixth annual National Disability Summit in Melbourne in March, all of the speakers except one were able-bodied. That person, in a wheelchair, had to be lifted up to the stage because there was no ramp. Furthermore, disabled activists in attendance told the Australian Broadcasting Corp. that the "disabled" section's table was at the back of the room, the food tables were elevated to accommodate standers, and one accessible toilet was being used as storage space.

Bright Ideas

German high school student Simon Schrader, 17, preparing for the all-important "Abitur" advanced-level tests to identify topperforming students, filed a formal request in April, under North Rhine-Westphalia state's generous freedom of information law, for an advance copy of the test. "I just wanted to see what they would say," he said. (He filed a little late, in that the state's deadline for responding came after most of the testing.)

Raising Our Most Delicate Generation: In preparation for the National Union of Students Women's Conference in Solihull, England, in March some attendees requested that clapping for any of the speakers be discouraged, but that approval from the audience be expressed by "jazz hands" - open hands, palm directed to the stage, and the fingers extended wildly. Using "jazz hands" would show compassion for attendees who have anxiety and other disorders, and for speakers who might be distracted by the din of approval.

People Different From Us

Venezuelan women's well-known obsession with bodily beauty usually focuses on face, breasts, and buttocks, and model Aleira Avendano has certainly had those surgeries. Traps and Escapes

Digging into local authors' Barefoot Dogs, Hausfrau, and Into the Field

BAREFOOT DOGS by Antonio Ruiz-Camacho Scribner, 160 pp., \$23

In all the categories of human tragedy visited upon the families and loved ones - murder, warfare, cancer, car wrecks, etc. - the torment of not knowing always twists the knife. In the failed state of Mexico, the phenomenon of kidnapping has created an epidemic of such suffering. According to some estimates, as many as 76 are kidnapped a day. Some are returned unharmed, some are delivered a piece at a time, many are never heard from again.

In Barefoot Dogs, Antonio Ruiz-Camacho introduces us to this strange circle of hell through the serial chapters of a novel (although everyone else seems to be referring to the book as "a collection of linked stories") about the Arteaga family. In their lives before we meet them, they were Mexico City elites five children and seven grandchildren - whose family patriarch, José Victoriano Arteaga, vanished one day on his way home from work.

Unlike the millions of immigrants who cross the U.S. border seeking jobs and safety, the Arteagas flee to the safety of new homes

in places like the upscale neighborhoods of Austin, an apartment in New York City, Palo Alto, and Madrid. And yet, Ruiz-Camacho deftly makes the heartbreak of their displacement, confusion, and grief a thing of painful beauty.


The first story, "It Will Be Awesome Before Spring," is narrated in the hyper-caffeinated and somewhat clueless voices of college students looking forward to a summer of Mediterranean cruises, kicking back in Tuscany, a photography workshop in Florence, and various contingencies. Why not, for example, "drive to Portofino and hang out there for a day or two - Italian highways are the best, we've heard, and no one cares about speed limits there, same as here, but highways there don't suck, so everybody agrees it will be awesome."

Encountering these feckless teens in other circumstances, we might be disinclined to like them, but this also turns out to be the year when they meet "people that don't live in the same neighborhoods as us ... performance artists and book editors ... who ride the subway and take taxicabs. It is a new and unexplored world within the same city we were born [W]e feel as if we're crossing an

invisible fence, trespassing into a forbidden side of ourselves: messier, wilder, sexier."

Near the end of summer, just when it seems that everyone is immune to nuance and foreboding, "we learn ... everybody's talking about kidnappings." When grandfather is kidnapped, it becomes the summer "all the members of my family will end up fleeing Mexico." Amid moments of doubt and neediness, that Mediterranean sojourn beckons: "Italy's calling, it will be splendid." But then, as an afterthought: "I'll need [my friends'] help to learn the language I'll be forced to use in the days to come, the tongue of the missing."

My favorite chapter/story here is "Deers," in which Susy, a former maid in the employ of the Arteagas, now works at a McDonald's in Austin. Just as she reports for the night shift, she learns that a grizzly bear has broken in. No employees were harmed, but the joint is locked up while the beast binges on doughnuts and soft drinks. The peckerwood manager cautions the employees against speaking to the media and jerkily refuses to let Susy and her co-worker Conchita come close enough to look inside at the bear.



I'm not even sure what some of the metaphors in Barefoot Dogs mean, but I know that in the days and weeks ahead, I'll still be thinking about this fine book and the mesmerizing talent of Antonio Ruiz-Camacho, and their meanings will probably come to me. If I have to read it over again, it will be time well spent. I loved this book. - Jesse Sublett



HAUSFRAU: A NOVEL

by Jill Alexander Essbaum Random House, 336 pp., \$26

Mad Men's Betty Draper embodied the twisted secrets of a housewife plagued by hellish sadness, sweltering isolation, and strangled relationships. Sabina, of Anaïs Nin's A Spy in the House of Love, systematically sought sexual healing in explicit extramarital affairs to ease her restlessness and fragmented self.

Somewhere between, there is Anna Benz, main character of Hausfrau. In desperate need of love, myopic but not intentionally cruel, her habitual, terrible decisions block every avenue to happiness. A deeply tragic character we'd love to hate but

cannot because each sliver of light in her dark world of devastation illuminates our own pain and potential steps toward tragedy. And it's mesmerizing: "This hyperbolic sadness consumed her. Except when it didn't. Which was rarely."

Striking parallels with Anna Karenina and Madame Bovary give Hausfrau a classic, timeless feel - trains, erotic trysts, and masked snarls of domesticity - while snippets of technology ("32 missed calls") root the story in modern times. Set in Switzerland, an intentionally neutral nation with similarly polished and polite citizens, expat-American Anna lives with her Swiss husband and children, all of whom she struggles to love well, and she stumbles every second, every day. She has few friends, doesn't speak the language, and functions with a shattered, shrouded psyche long steeped in fear and pain. Subconscious screams for relief from intense depression and loneliness transform her body into a vessel for her next fix. Sex is all she craves, and not at all what she needs, causing her to avoid the glare of truth with startling behavior: "A secret's safest hiding place is in the open." This is a tale of (un)consciousness, not morality, and it is very, very sad.

Still, despite a foreboding box of death announcements, secrets teetering on the brink of disastrous discovery, and gut-wrenching tragedy, the pages fly by, a testament to Essbaum's elegant prose influenced by her long-celebrated poetic chops. Symbolism abounds – fire and shadows, God and grief, redemption and place - and Anna's psychotherapy sessions incorporate fascinating philosophical elements. "What stays in shadow controls you," but in between the paint cracks and brushstrokes, this portrait of a woman possesses a glimmer of that inexplicable hope that refuses, against the odds, to die. - Jessi Cape



This spring, local poet Jill Alexander Essbaum published her first novel: Hausfrau, a beautifully haunting work of fiction that explores the desperation of a depressed expat housewife in Switzerland. We caught up with Essbaum via phone to ask about main character Anna Benz's

Austin Chronicle: There are the much-touted Anna Karenina and Madame Bovary references in Hausfrau, but I also keep having flashes of Anaïs Nin's A Spy in the House of Love - in subject matter and in the beautiful writing. There's something classic about Anna and how

the book tackles the intersection of women, sex, and shame. Jill Alexander Essbaum: I would say it's Madame Bovary more than Anna Karenina, although of course there's a huge nod in that direction. There's no way around that. But Madame Bovary is closer to what's going on - the setup is very similar. And Anna's situation - she's an outsider. She's married to a man who may be not be best suited to her. She's bored, although her boredom may be a

little more connected to some existential problems. I think it is a little more serious, and potentially there may be some postpartum stuff going on. It's not a retelling, and I like to think it becomes its own story.

There are a lot of people who've read the book and want to say that it's dated in the sense that women don't stay at home, women don't lock themselves in their surroundings, and women don't go without their own checking accounts, and that's just wrong. You don't have to not have a bank account or a job to be locked into something in a marriage. But it's not an indictment of marriage or motherhood. People have asked me what I'm saying about marriage or motherhood. I'm saying nothing. I'm saying something about this woman.

What I might be alluding to is that all of us are only a few steps away from making some decision that we really wish we hadn't. Or at least I know that I am. Her decisions just happen to be about the men she's chosen to sleep with. It could've been about how much money she gambled away or what drugs she decided to take into her body. How many steps away am I from doing something that can't be undone?

INTO THE FIELD: A FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT'S NOTEBOOK

by Tracy Dahlby University of Texas Press, 312 pp., \$29.95

Tracy Dahlby spent most of 30 years as an international reporter, all over Asia, gathering armloads of awards and a head full of strange experiences along the way. Since 2006, he's

been a journalism professor at the University of Texas. As an educator and author, Dahlby is passionate about journalistic storytelling, particularly in the digital age – something more than a just-the-facts approach.

His memoir is centered mostly on his experiences writing for National Geographic magazine in Asia, covering China's handover of Hong Kong, its rise as a global power; and Vietnam in 1995, 20 years after

the last U.S. combat troops were withdrawn following the worst U.S. foreign policy misadventure until we invaded Iraq in 2003. Ripe with anecdotes and practically florid with the sense of romance of working in foreign, often mysterious and dangerous locales, Into the Field is a reporter's diary rich with anecdotes, epigraphs, and sentiment. Some of the best advice for aspiring journalists comes in the form of Dahlby's accounts of his own foibles and naïveté.

The spark that lit the fire for Dahlby occurred when he was a college student, sitting in his parents' basement in Seattle, listening to a transistor radio – which he recalls being a big, boxy thing that today would probably fetch a fortune on eBay. The year was 1969, and for the past several years in China, Chairman Mao Zedong's cultural revolution had been busily mulching everything and everyone that didn't fit inside his little red book. As Dahlby listened to his radio, a one-minute report by a journalist in the field communicat-

> ed the notion of adventure, danger, and romance of being an international reporter, walking through the eye of the hurricane of world-shaking events. He's still addicted to it.

> Heading for Hong Kong on a cruise ship crowded with Cantonese gamblers. Dahlby set the stage for his first China dispatch for National Geographic: "It began one steamy evening as the sun dropped behind the green cone of Hong Kong's

Victoria Peak and I hauled my duffel bag along the dock toward a boxy cruise liner called the Star Pisces."

Those lines capture the sense of romance of going out to observe and write about the world beyond one's comfort zone, and it's that sense that Dahlby strives to instill in young aspiring journalists today. It also makes Into the Field a book worth checking out - not only for journalism students and fans, but armchair adventurers. - LS.

Creating Equality

In Zach Theatre's staging of the epic political drama All the Way, the fight for civil rights feels powerfully urgent

"Is this America?" asks the woman, her voice ablaze with disbelief and outrage. She's just described her arrest, imprisonment in a county jail, and beating at the behest of a state highway patrolman - who ordered two prisoners to batter her with a blackjack as she lay face down on a bunk - all because she sought to register African-American citizens to

vote in Mississippi. "Is this America, the land of the free and the home of the brave, where our lives be threatened daily because we want to live as decent human beings in America?" Though asked

from the remove of a half-century - during testimony given by civil rights activist Fannie Lou Hamer to the Credentials Committee at the 1964 Democratic National Convention - the question still scalds, in part because of the righteous fire in actor Michelle Alexander, but also because we recognize in it our nation's brutal, shameful treatment of black lives, throughout history and even to this day.

That gulf between this land's ideals and its realities is the foundation of Robert Schenkkan's Tony Award-winning All the Way, its truth underscored graphically in Zach Theatre's production by the massive mural backing Cliff Simon's set: the iconic

image of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, emblazoned with the phrase "All men are created equal" and flanked

> by portraits of men, women, and children who, because their skin is not the same shade as the Founders', weren't - and aren't - treated equally. That mural looms insistently over the action, much as Lyndon Johnson does

> > over the politicos from whom he wants something, and there's no escaping the message. So as the play exposes us to many of the trials faced by blacks in the early Sixties, especially in the South, we

feel keenly the desperate need for remedy. Indeed, the hallmark of this staging by Artistic Director Dave Steakley, what seizes the heart and lingers in the mind, is its urgency regarding justice for African-Americans. That is a testament both to the actors here portraying leaders of the Movement - they imbue passionate debates over strategies and protest tactics with grave consequence, so that we sense life and death riding on every outcome - and how close to the bone the script cuts to what's happening in our country right now. "I'm sick and tired of going to funerals for black men who have been murdered by white men." shouts a young man played by Delanté G.



Keys, and in his voice is all the pain, frustration, and fury of Miami, of Ferguson, of Staten Island, North Charleston, Baltimore.

With this sense of inequality and injustice so present in us, we're deeply invested in LBJ's labors during his first year in the White House to use his power as president to enact meaningful reforms. Schenkkan has built this epic political drama on Johnson's efforts to pass the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and given it the sweep and intensity of a Shakespearean history, with Johnson as driven, cunning, and tragically flawed as any ruler penned by the Bard. Indeed, Schenkkan's LBJ is so robust a figure that All the Way can work purely as a character study, the portrait of a politician who, having spent his career in a relentless pursuit of power, finally reaches its ultimate seat and must decide what to do. In Steve Vinovich, Steakley has landed a skilled and winning actor to embody the 36th President. He has the look of LBJ, though that won't carry you far in such a demanding role; it's far more crucial that the actor has Johnson's history in his bones – the poverty of his Central Texas youth, the experience of teaching poor Mexican kids in Cotulla, the years of arm-twisting and backstabbing in the U.S. Senate, the profound

need for approval - and that Vinovich has. He shows a Lone Star native's love of a good yarn and a good fight in this sly smile that he flashes both when he's unspooling a dirty joke and when his LBJ has somebody by the balls. It's a smile that says he loves knowing where the bodies are buried and employing that knowledge for his own ends.

But as intriguing and complicated as LBJ is in Vinovich's hands, this production of All the Way isn't just his story. It's those ends of his we keep coming back to: equal rights enshrined in law, as fervently espoused by Fannie Lou Hamer and Martin Luther King Jr. (Melvin Abston, commanding yet vulnerable), Roy Wilkins (a piercingly pragmatic William Earl Ray) and Stokely Carmichael (a fierce J. Quinton Johnson). The path to it is paved in battles, betrayals, and backroom deals, and it's as compelling to see re-created here as the process itself is ugly. So, is this America? In the end, we must acknowledge that it is, a land that falls disgracefully short of our national aspirations. But All the Way shows us that if we're that America, we are also the America where progress is possible - if we can stomach the blood that comes with birthing it. - Robert Faires



What do a witch, a parrot, and a bartender all have in common? The first answer is, not much. The second answer is, they're all roles played by one of the actors in Random Acts of Magic, this year's Out of Ink offering from ScriptWorks.

Out of Ink is a variety set. The annual ScriptWorks production uses short plays by member writers, drafted over the course of a weekend from three prompts and revised over a few rehearsals. The spirit of the thing is not knowing what you'll get as a producer or as an audience member.

In the past, I've been involved at various times as a writer, dramaturg, and script judge. I also socialize with a few of this year's talent. But then, who in Austin hasn't been involved? Eight writers, five directors, a dozen actors, and a design team power this year's production. Multiply that by the 17 times that Out of Ink has run, and you have more people than there are seats at this year's venue, Hyde Park Theatre.

The prompts for this year instructed the playwrights to include a piece of magic, a wardrobe switch, and a character's most embarrassing moment, and the result includes a few silly comedies, a few thoughtful pieces, and one or two serious works. In order of performance, it's nursery rhyme adaptation (silly), time warp in a bar (thoughtful), revealing date night (serious), fairy tale (silly), a tale of aging (thoughtful), teen angst (thoughtful), sisterly conflict (serious), and performing animals (silly).

As is common with the short-play format. a number of the plays suffer from how-do-lend-this?-itis. Having said that, the evening overall is worthwhile and interesting. How will eight writers handle the most embarrassing moment for a character, for example? It could be giving birth to frogs, being turned down for a dance, or the kind of public moment that reveals a person's cruelty. The second act comes out stronger on average, with plays either exploring more original concepts or writing about common ideas with a unique voice. ScriptWorks ordered the shows smartly, with clean transitions and finishing on the highest of the comedic notes. Kirk German's play about angsty performing animals.

ScriptWorks also delivers on a tight budget, per usual. The design team succeeds in providing bare-bones but sufficient staging for a wide range of plays. (Remember the parrotwitch-bartender?)

The longstanding strength of the Out of Ink productions is bringing together a great and supportive cast and set of directors who can spin gold. For fellow theatre artists, it's a nice buffet of who's working in town right now who's good with new work. For other audiences, well, it's fun. The 10-minute play format is kind of like a tapas bar. Nothing on its own will fill you all the way up, and the idea is to open yourself to trying many things. It's a pleasant - Elizabeth Cobbe and satisfying course.


"This is Benjamin. He's a little worried about his future." You probably know the tagline. And if you don't, you almost certainly know the image: Anne Bancroft's legs in the foreground, with a sheepish Dustin Hoffman looking on, hands in pockets. As a movie, *The Graduate* is one of the most lauded

works of American cinema, known for its groundbreaking filmmaking techniques and harsh social commentary. Unbeknownst to many, Mike Nichols' film is actually based on Charles Webb's novel of the same name, which was adapted for the stage in 2000 by Terry Johnson (brought to the West End with a red-hot Kathleen Turner as Mrs. Robinson). Taking on a cult classic of this caliber automatically invites comparison, and City Theatre Company's current production brings to life the tale's famous (or infamous, really) characters in a way that pays homage to the film without trying to imitate it.

If you're looking for a scene-by-scene reiteration of the movie, Johnson's script may not be for you. Pulling scenes from the book that were not included in the film and drumming up a few extra gives this stage adaptation some marked differences from the movie. Some of these I found logical for the change of medium: confining exchanges to one room or omitting scenes involving the pool, for example. Other changes to the story, however, I found detracted greatly: the so-called "simplicity" of Elaine's character, the added drunken conversation she has with her mother, and the series of events from the church to the play's (totally changed) final moment. But perhaps I would have no issue with these choices had I not been expecting something that adhered more closely to the film.

Despite any expectations going into the production, this cast's talent is difficult to deny. As the wayward Benjamin Braddock, Tim Ashby gives a fine portrayal of his character's angst and disillusionment, while sprinkling in some of the character's required nervousness. Like Bancroft before her, Tracy Hurd plays a Mrs. Robinson who isn't trying to seduce anyone - from her sultry voice to her elegance, her attractiveness leaps off the stage. Commanding more of the spotlight in the play than the film is Mrs. Robinson's daughter. Elaine, whom Benjamin eventually falls for (or perhaps only thinks he does). Angelina Castillo gives her a big heart and believably portrays a wide range of emotions, so it's a shame that the play calls for Elaine to be less autonomous and intelligent than in the film. I would have enjoyed seeing her as a stronger female character. Still, Castillo excelled with the material she was given.

Rounding out the experience is Andy Berkovsky's apt scenic and lighting design, minimalistic but period appropriate and one of my favorites in City Theatre's recent history. Tracy Arnold's direction is sharp, and the quickly executed scene transitions keep the story rolling along at an enjoyable pace. Despite the script's deficiencies, City Theatre has mounted a well-acted and provocative version of a landmark piece. – Elissa Russell

DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Project Row Houses lines up along Holman Street in Houston's predominantly black Third Ward like pointed silver and white helmets belonging to some army of giants. The eight shotgun houses along this block are galleries and studios for new artists.

In a city known for its world-class art museums, this art has a different kind of freshness. The art hanging in the sunny rooms is a mix of mediums. Some of the abstract panels were over my head, but it was all interesting.

Built in the Thirties, the former rental houses were rescued from demolition in the Nineties by artist Rick Lowe. Ultimately, 22 houses in one of the oldest African-American neighborhoods in Houston were renovated with a combination of volunteers and grants from foundations.

Since 1994, the project has grown in scope to become a cultural as well as artistic influence in the community. Some of the PRH houses are used to give young mothers a year of free housing to allow them time to finish their education. The organization also

sponsors a neighborhood food co-op and entrepreneurship workshops. In 1999, the group was given the historic two-story Eldorado Ballroom where young musicians played before they became legends. It is now a community center.

CRICKERS CRACKERS

Eating insects may seem to be the latest fad for armchair Andrew Zimmerns, but the makers of Crickers are no novelty act. The website's handy infographics point to all the very good reasons (both health and environmental) we should all add the word exoskeleton to our foodie vocabulary, but you won't need any other reason than the taste. And for the squeamish, rest assured that the crickets are ground into the flour. There are no antennae to contend with (we're sorry to disappoint your 4-year-old). There's limited distribution for now, but the founders are hoping their Kickstarter (ending May 2) will change that. www.crickerscrackers.com.



KTONIC KOMBUCHA

You can't judge a, er, kombucha by its cover, but dang it if the sharp typography and cheery colors of KTonic isn't a welcome reprieve from the more psychedelic industry norm. The family business' approach to the ancient beverage is all contemporary, too. It's 100% tea with low sugar, and the taste is not masked with "natural flavors." That may be because the owners, husband and wife Mark and Lisa Spedale, are former caterers and restaurateurs. AUNT BLUE BELL More than 30 years ago when my older sister and her family moved to Houston from the rural Arkansas delta, my young nephews were inun-

dated with introductions to big-city life and lots of new family members. Blue Bell ice cream was something new and exotic to them, because at the time, the Brenham company's product was only distributed in Texas. After a summer of sharing meals and celebrating holidays with new family members, my nephew Todd Frank scanned the room one day and queried, "Who is my Aunt Blue Bell? She sure makes good ice cream," and I've thought of the little creamery in Brenham as Aunt Blue

Bell ever since. I'm betting that we're not unique in that fond familial affiliation with the Texas ice cream company, and I'm hopeful that kind of brand loyalty will see it through the current difficulties caused by listeria contamination. According to the most recent press information, after a complete product recall the company began simultaneous employee training and intensive cleaning programs at its three production facilities in Alabama, Oklahoma, and Texas on Monday, April 27. "We intend

to make a fresh start and that begins with intensive cleaning and enhanced training. This is a paradigm-shifting event at Blue Bell and we want to put in place new systems to drive continuous improvement," said Blue Bell CEO and President Paul Kruse.

OH KIMCHI FANS WERE **DISTRESSED** to read last week's Facebook post from owner Abbi Cheek Lunde explaining why she and her husband **Duane** have closed their wildly successful local artisan

food company and moved to the Ozarks in Missouri. The Lundes' remarkable kimchi products were based on techniques and family recipes that were part of Abbi's Korean heritage, and the little company developed a large and loyal customer base in less than two years of operation. Unfortunately, each new step up the ladder

of success brought more work and difficulties that finally overwhelmed them. Abbi describes it this way: "The government was continually pressuring us to change ingredients, pay for more testing we couldn't afford to meet the same standards as a large manufacturer, and prove the quality of a product that they had no previous knowledge of. We were guinea pigs for the state, and the pressure to do the right thing versus what would keep us financially afloat destroyed us."



Mixed-use developments are all the rage in Austin's urban core these days, and one new Eastside property offers an eclectic culinary lineup that's sure to attract potential residents as well as ambient neighborhood foot traffic. Four of the ground-level spaces at the new Corazon building are leased to locally owned food concerns, and a fifth space will be home to a Japanese izakaya and sushi bar from chef Kazu Fukumoto this summer. Parking spots are available in the building garage and the stores will validate. We recently checked things out from one end of the Corazon block to the other, eating to our hearts' content.





This friendly, upscale neighborhood convenience store occupies a sunny corner spot on the west end of Corazon. Proprietor Brenda Le has a background in accounting and finance, but this is her first food service venture with partner Albert Pham. The partners are still getting to know the building tenants and surrounding neighbors and are actively seeking feedback and suggestions about local products shoppers would like to see in the store. Shelves are now stocked with cereals, snacks,

Jeremy and Nicole Portwood are another hardworking, local entrepreneurial couple who have parlayed a food trailer success story into their first brick-and-mortar operation. Their new place is a snug spot a couple of blocks west of their former trailer location. It features an open kitchen and limited counter seating because the focus here is on takeout and delivery, although plans for outdoor counter seating are in the works. Grab a craft beer at the counter and watch the staff tossing dough for 10- or 14-inch pizzas or building hot, hearty sandwiches, all named for Greek gods. While all the Spartan sauces and salad dressings are made fresh in-house, queso afi-

cionados will want to try the secret Portwood family recipe for jalapeño cheese dip, served cold with some hot tortilla chips made at El Milagro just across the street. It's a taste treat. For our money, the Spartan dough is the real star working in the service of the mythic pizza gods - tossed and stretched, it provides the pizzas with a base that's crisp on the outside but still chewy; baked in thicker sheets, it's the perfect delivery system for hot sandwiches. Can't wait until their delivery area includes my street.



The main attraction here is the in-store deli and scratch bakery serving Vietnamese mainstays such as bánh mì and vermicelli bowls based on Le and Pham family recipes. There is also an attractive selection of French and American pastry items created by baker Tien Hoang. Look for reliable croissants, eclairs, cream puffs, and napoleons as well as a few varieties of big, soft American cookies and tender, cakey muffins. Bánh mì sandwiches here are made on ciabatta baguettes from the bakery, which are also for sale in both large and demi sizes, and the small loaves of jalapeño Cheddar bread make a wonderful savory toast.

This cozy spot evokes a sense of urban Italian chic with closely packed black tables, gleaming mirrors, and sleek metal accents. The enticing flavors of gelati and sorbetti are determined by the inspiration of the gelatieri (gelato makers) and the seasonal availability of organic fruits and herbs. On one of our recent visits, we were wowed by the lovely floral notes in the orange cardamom and found that the combination of minty fernet with shavings of Valrhona dark chocolate created a gustatory love story. Espresso fans should try an affogato (drowned gelato) made with a scoop of the luxurious Valrhona dark chocolate gelato, or go for a truly intense treat and pour the espresso shot over a scoop of the Vietnamese coffee. Completing the sophisticated Italian experience are an array of distinctly adult beverages at the bar. Indulge in Negronis and various amaro-based digestive cocktails created to complement gelato. Though the trademark here is a cosmopolitan Italian aesthetic, forager Valerie Broussard informs us that Gemelli keeps it local with milk from the Texas Organic Valley dairy cooperative, Tweed coffees, Earl Grey tea from the Steeping Room, and organic fruit from Texas growers (strawberries now, blackberries, peaches, figs, and blueberries to come) when available. Coming soon - Kiskadee chocolate bars.





Fortune-Telling

LUCKY'S PUCCIAS AND PIZZERIA WRITES A NEW STORY

Another day, another established trailer making the transition to brick-and-mortar. In an Austin food scene experiencing the fuzzy afterglow of its cultural capital, narrative is everything. It makes the difference between deafeningly loud and echo-y dining rooms; it defines what diners regard as their tried-andtrue. We like to see our chefs on the Food Network or making (perhaps dubious) claims about a culinary upbringing. It lets us tell a story to ourselves. We're hip, we're knowledgeable. Relevant.

We were somewhat curious as to why Lucky's Puccias and Pizzeria wasn't packed on either of our visits, while other trucks who made a similarly timed jump (the Peached Tortilla, Kebabalicious, Chi'Lantro) seem to almost always have lines. The truck had (and still has) a narrative that should lure customers like a cartoon pie cooling on a windowsill. Luciano Sibilla made his name some time ago with his puccia sandwiches, specifically the cultish bread, racking up a flurry of national articles and TV appearances in the process.

That bread has the added benefit of being micro-authentic. It was almost his own personal carb

Not much has changed there. The bread,

fired to order, is still buzzworthy. For those unfamiliar, it's similar to pizza dough - neutral enough to support almost any filling. And like a police chief in a prime time procedural, the charred crust gives way to a cuddly interior. It's easy to binge.

The truck's menu also hasn't changed, at least in the sandwich section, bringing back classics like the Lucky's (prosciutto, mozzarella, and Lucky's ubiquitous chipotle aioli), the Vegetariana (showcasing artichoke pesto), and the Classica (ham and fontina). True, the dining room doesn't have that retro futurist thing that is manna to Austin diners. One wall is a lazy Tuscan red, and the room is scattered with drum shades and a few nondescript photos. But folks still flock to the truck at the Tiniest Bar

in Texas, happily eating in what's essentially a backyard. Maybe the locations are too close together, maybe the Austin diner is distracted from the small bites and the fusion and the hip-hip-hooray, but the elevated yet understandable food should be enough to have the storefront hopping.

We tried a few puccias we had not gotten around to at the trailer. The Nutella (\$6 full size) was everything one would expect, a fat-bomb crowd-pleaser that could only be improved by a few slices of banana. The porketta's (the mini version at \$4.75) shredded red cabbage wound up everywhere but our stomachs, but the pork loin was splendid by itself. Unfortunately, the chipotle cloud didn't allow a ray of fontina's nuttiness through. That aioli was better used in the mini hot pastrami (\$4.75), a maximalist blend of four cheeses, tangy peppers, sharp red onion, and smoky pastrami. There's no subtlety of flavor, and the heat isn't for everyone, but it gives rollercoaster thrills.

Nuance isn't really Lucky's gig anyway. The anything-goes approach extends to the Neapolitan-ish pizza. We wonder if the Americana pizza (\$14.75) is a reflection of Puglia, Italy-native Sibilla's view on his new countrymen. It's a dubstep drop of a pizza, adding a thick layer of mozzarella, pancetta, french fries, and a fried egg to the tomato base. It still all works somehow. The Diavola (\$13) takes a less chaotic approach as a proxy for pepperoni. It's a little greasy, but a blot is all it needs. Pizza is not for prima donnas.

We weren't wild about the new pizza (\$5 as a mini), a Margherita divorced to resemble the Italian flag. The components were fine, and the pesto stripe could have worked on its own, but we hoped for an ingredient reconciliation. It's not yet on the menu though, so perhaps some tweaking is still to come. The crudo e arugula (\$14.74) is just the right pie for spring. The arugula lent pepper to the

we are a fan, we decided to opt out of the Dolce Neve gelato (OK fine, it was sold out). We chose instead a pair of housemade options. We weren't prepared to be impressed when the ready-made sweets came out of a cooler. And we were a bit perplexed when there was then a slight wait from counter to table. But the \$6 moulleux au chocolate (a molten lava cake when it's feeling a bit more populist) came out with toasted LUCKY'S PUCCIAS almonds and a piped plume of whipped cream & PIZZERIA to one side of the rectan-1611 W. casual place (the taste - though nothing new - was on point, too). The salted caramel pot de crème (\$6) wasn't quite as showy, but the brûléed flavor carried no twinge of regret.

If Austin diners still need more visibility and chatter, maybe it's time for a break from the near-constant riot of new. And when we are all a little more grounded, we suggest you eat a damn sandwich. - Brandon Watson

AFS SPOTLIGHTS CONTEMPORARY FRENCH CINEMA by Josh Kupecki

It's a running joke around here that you can walk into a random movie theatre at any given moment in this city, and chances are there's a film festival going on. Ain't nothing wrong with that; it's a constant embarrassment of riches in which local cineastes often have to make the hard choices between, say, a screening of a film noir classic or an obscure indie film from Peru. As the summer film season kicks off (see our thoughts on that on p.54), and costumed crusaders induce us into a

CGI-spectacle-laden coma, the Austin Film Society has cleverly counterattacked with a weekend of delightful and surprising films from up-and-coming filmmakers from France. Curated by programmers from the esteemed Premiers Plans Festival d'Angers, these films showcase emerging talent from our Gallic friends on the other side of the Atlantic.

First up is Spartacus & Cassandra, a vivid documentary by loanis Nuguet (who will be in attendance at the screening),

about the titular brother and sister, two Roma children living in a makeshift circus community in Paris. Caught between the desires of their homeless parents and Camille, a trapeze artist who offers to be their guardian, the film is a heartfelt (and often heartbreaking) look at unhealthy familial relationships, the French welfare system, and the unassailable bond of two siblings navigating a tumultuous period of their lives. The film poetically evocates the joys of childhood, but a bitter aftertaste of Europe's treatment of the Romani remains, even when it seems the children have found a new life.

Insecure (Qui Vive) concerns Chérif (Reda Kateb), a man in his 30s still living with his parents. A security guard at a local mall, he yearns for a better place in society. After failing a written nursing test three times, he finally passes, moving him on to an intimidating oral exam. Chérif's life is complicated by friends from his childhood who have since gone criminal, a budding romance with a local girl, Jenny (Blue Is the Warmest Color's Adèle Exarchopoulos), and an increasingly hostile group of youths who harass him to the point of exasperation. In a desperate move, Chérif

attempts to get the kids off his back, and the results turn tragic. Insecure offers up a glimpse of a Paris suburb little seen except for those living in it. Director Marianne Tardieu will be on hand to add insight to the many nuances the film portrays.

Lastly, there is *Tonnerre*, named after the town in north central France (the name translates to "thunder"), where we have Maxime (Vincent Macaigne), a musician who has moved back in with his father, falling for Mélodie (Solène Rigot), a significantly younger newspaper reporter. Their affair, at first playful and innocuous, becomes increasingly menacing when she returns to her ex, Ivan (Jonas Bloquet), and Maxime is sent into a spiral of madness. If there is a French version of mumblecore, this is it.

AFS has been hitting it out of the park recently in bringing to Austin films from around the world. These are films worth your time, and this may be your only chance to watch them. So do yourself a favor and see the world from another perspective. Chances are, it's not too different from your own.

OLD GUARD, NEW MONEY

THREE LOCAL GAMES PUSH CROWDFUNDING SUCCESS TO ANOTHER LEVEL by James Renovitch

It's been a while since Austin had a blockbuster video game developed within its city limits. Star Wars: The Old Republic feels like ages ago, and the woefully under-recognized Donkey Kong Country: Tropical Freeze didn't quite leave a lasting impact. Big things are on the horizon though, with three old-guard developers embracing new business models and finding financial success. If the quality of the games matches the dollar amounts, there will be reason to celebrate. Here's a breakdown of who's doing what and exactly how much scratch they have to work with.

STAR CITIZEN

The biggest success funding-wise comes from the man who brought the space-dogfighting series Wing Commander to PCs in the early Nineties. Chris Roberts' work-in-progress adds elements of massively multiplayer online games to his trademark game style. Early access to the game is open to contributors. After a successful Kickstarter, the money continued to roll in through contributions via the game's website. About half of the money coming in is from new purchasers. The other half comes from current backers who are upgrading by purchasing in-game items like limited-edition ships costing up to \$2,500.

SHROUD OF THE AVATAR

If you know one local video game developer, you probably know Richard Garriott. Before he was taking working vacations in outer space, he was the creator of the Ultima series of adventure games. Ultima Online hit prehistoric modems in 1997 and was the first massively multiplayer game, with 250,000 users at the height of its popularity. Despite not having rights to use the Ultima name anymore, Shroud of the Avatar might as well be named Ultima Online II. Crowdfunding continues on the game's site with virtual property going for up to \$1,050 (insert gentrification joke here). Players are already exploring the online world with occasional quality time with Lord British (Garriott's ingame alter ego).

Total funds raised to date: \$6.18 million



CROWFALL

The relative new kid on the crowdfunding block, Crowfall is the product of a partnership between Gordon Walton and J Todd Coleman, who may not be household names, but have made enough games between them to make fans trust them with their money. The secret weapon behind the online game might be design consultant Raph Koster, who was the mastermind behind the innovations of Ultima Online. The game is not playable yet, so the big bucks made from selling virtual goods (should they decide to go that route) haven't rolled in just yet.

Moviegoers Assemble!

Superheroes trounce everything but the comic-book formula

In a world that has neither SHIELD to defend it nor HYDRA to destroy it, Tony Stark finds himself thinking a bit bigger. After all, 2012's The Avengers saw the arms dealer-turned-do-gooder and titular company successfully fend off intergalactic invaders. What's to say it couldn't happen again? What's to stop Tony from creating an artificial intelligence designed to keep the peace on a global scale? Furthermore, what's to prevent said A.I. from deciding that humanity faces no greater threat than itself?

Sounds like a bunch of nonsense, huh? To its credit, Avengers: Age of Ultron is impressively orchestrated nonsense, being the 11th big-screen entry over the past seven years to constitute Marvel's lucrative cinematic universe of comic book adaptations. The brand's inescapable cultural saturation puts to shame any government agency or sinister technology depicted to date, and writer/

director Joss Whedon's sequel in particular thrives on next-level plate-spinning rather than coming remotely close to breaking the billion-dollar mold set by its predecessor.

These days, Stark (Downey Jr.), aka Iron Man, along with the hammer-wielding Thor (Hemsworth), anachronistic super-soldier

Captain America (Evans), ever-nimble assassin Black Widow (Johansson), rage-prone Hulk (Ruffalo), and ace archer Hawkeye (Renner), have checked their egos and tempers for the sake of the human race. Alas, once Stark boots up his well-meaning Ultron program, it quickly assumes the form of an


eight-foot-tall robot (sardonically voiced by Spader) and determines that nothing could protect the world quite like an extinctionlevel reset. Assisted by a pair of superpowered twins (Taylor-Johnson's Quicksilver and Olsen's Scarlet Witch) with their own anti-Stark agenda, Ultron sets forth on breaking the team apart from within, exploiting their deepest insecurities to render Earth's mightiest heroes vulnerable once more.

With a well-established team dynamic already working in his favor, Whedon strikes a better balance this time out in transitioning between beats of exposition, moments of tenderness or levity, and frenzied bouts of action. (Such a concerted effort is made to avoid familiar American landmarks and collateral damage in general that Ultron feels like a very intentional counterpoint to Man of Steel's city-wasting melees; instead, countless hostile robots get crushed like so many soda cans.) Despite a parade of fan-baiting money shots and choice quips, what this supersized sequel can hardly muster is any real sense of novelty to rival the superherouniting spectacle that seemed so shiny and new just three summers ago.

Perhaps to knock Ultron for being a mostly coherent assembly of globe-trotting, gadgets, and glib one-liners is akin to knocking the better Bond films for delivering well on formula while rarely defying it. As swell as it is swollen, this entry operates on a larger scale while

retaining the same planet-saving stakes, with mortality hardly ever more than an inconvenience. It is the product of a machine perfectly evolved for the sole purpose of annihilating boredom, a machine whose primary weakness is the utter indifference of

those uninitiated or unimpressed by this point. For the rest of us, it's a hearty helping of fine. Maria Enders (Binoche) is a seasoned French actress who, as Clouds of Sils Maria opens, is traveling to Zurich by train with her assistant Valentine (Stewart) to accept an award on behalf of her mentor, a writer who had given Maria her first break in a play called The Maloja Snake, which served as the young actress' launching pad to fame. Our first introduction to the two women finds Valentine deftly juggling calls on a couple of cell phones while crouched in the corridor of the moving train, and Maria self-absorbed in her partially written acceptance speech and details of her impending divorce. Then news arrives that the honoree has suddenly died and Maria shifts into a more reflective and morose tone as it becomes clear the

gathering will be more memorial than celebration. While in Zurich, Maria is approached to play the role of the older woman in a revival of The Maloja Snake, the play in which she originally performed the role of the lesbian ingenue who drives the older woman to selfobliteration. Obviously, it's a role that Maria seems destined to play, but also one that causes her great consternation.

Maria and Valentine hole up in the dead playwright's chalet in Sils Maria, a village near St. Moritz. As Valentine runs lines with Maria, the boundaries between the fiction on the page and the present reality grow porous. Binoche performs brilliantly, shifting imperceptibly between the two dimensions, and Stewart is every inch her equal as she lends the perspective of vouthful insouciance and serves as a faithful but authentic counterbalance to Maria's self-absorption.

(Stewart earned a well-deserved César, France's equivalent to the Oscars, for her performance.) The introduction of Jo-Ann Ellis (Moretz), a wild-child actress selected for the ingenue role, lends a whole other level to the refractions taking place in the film.

Clouds of Sils Maria hasn't many plot points to chew over; its action resides in the conversations and reverberations that take place among the story's women. Although there are shades of All About Eve here, the resonances lean more toward the fluid identities of the actresses in Ingmar Bergman's work or even Assayas' own Irma Vep. The nuances of the women's interactions are a splendid thing to observe, and the beauty of these layered conversations makes the general absence of women's unmitigated voices in film more keenly felt than ever. Assayas has a way of thrusting viewers into scenes already in progress that enhances the vibrancy of the material, and though the film might occasionally seem as distant as the Alps to some viewers. there is no getting around the thrills of these women's verbal and emotional slaloms.

ODIOR AND I

D: Frédéric Tcheng. (NR, 89 min., subtitled)

A piece of Dior haute couture to hang in the closet is probably not in most of our futures, but this enthralling documentary allows viewers to finger the hem, so to speak, of some grand designs indeed. The film chronicles the 2012 arrival of new artistic director Raf Simons at the Parisian House of Dior and the galloping, mere eight weeks he had to produce his first collection for an audience of fashionistas and their perfectly manicured talons.

While Simons – a soft-spoken Belgian who's pretty obviously stressed out of his gourd – is the film's entry point, *Dior and I*'s net scoops up a multilingual consortium of creatives and craftspeople toiling away at so much tulle. (Incidentally, the seamstresses wear heels. So chic.) The language barrier borders the Babel-esque; it's a surprise fount of humor, too, as when a translator is terrified to pass along an Italian tailor's request to the French-speaking chief seamstress, knowing she'll be furious at the added work.

Onto this fly-on-the-wall portrait of an atelier at work, writer/director Frédéric Tcheng appli-

qués an ethereal narration drawn from founding designer Christian Dior's own autobiography, Dior by Dior. (Tcheng employed a voicefrom-beyond-the-grave technique less successfully in 2011's Diana Vreeland: The Eye Has to Travel, which he co-directed.) The narration is a nifty double-tasker: both contextual aid and artistic statement. By using Dior's personal musings - on founding his fashion house, his philosophies on life, his dealings with the press - Tcheng neatly establishes the legacy of Dior and, consequently, how very high the stakes are for Simons, while also prepping the audience for mirroring points in Simons' own narrative arc. The young designer didn't benefit from the same cheat sheet, admitting he stopped reading Dior's memoir on page 15 because the similarities were "too weird."

The doc concludes with the debut of Simons' collection, a spectacle I won't spoil for anyone without a Vogue subscription only to say that Tcheng, cinematographer Gilles Piquard, and editor Julio Perez IV assemble a flat-out thrilling representation of a geographically tricky catwalk/backstage and an emotionally draining day. Dior and I's only misstep is saved for the final credits, which roll over a black screen with random bursts of blinding light meant to mimic a camera flash. No matter the season: Seizureinducing is never a good look.

LITTLE BOY

D: Alejandro Monteverde; with Jakob Salvati, Cary-Hiroyuki Tagawa, Emily Watson, Tom Wilkinson, David Henrie, Michael Rapaport, Kevin James, Ted Levine, Ben Chaplin, Ali Landry. (PG-13, 106 min.)

Awash in a gauzy glaze of engineered nostalgia, the precocious Little Boy is a Norman Rockwell knockoff about the mountain-moving power of faith. Sometimes, a mustard seed is just a mustard seed. Set in a small coastal town in Northern California during World War II. its titular voungster is the oddly named Pepper Busbee (Salvati), a diminutive 8-year-old with a big heart. Teased and bullied by his classmates due to his size - the politically incorrect "midget" is a frequent epithet lobbed his way - the more nicely nicknamed "Little Boy" finds solace in both a close relationship with the loving father (Rapaport) he idolizes and his devotion to a cheesy comic-book and movie-serial hero named Ben Eagle, a daredevil magician who inspires his No. 1 fan with the rhetorical question, "Do you think you can do it?" when things get rough. When Pepper's older brother, London (a miscast Henrie, looking more like Rocky Balboa Jr. than a member of his Anglicized film family), is rejected for military service due to his flat-footedness (there's a metaphor in there somewhere), the Busbee paterfamilias is conscripted instead. Led by a well-meaning priest to believe he can end the war and ensure the safe return of his beloved dad simply through the exercise of sheer will, the height-challenged lad checks off a list of good deeds to achieve his objective, one being befriending an elderly Japanese-American man (Tagawa) vilified by the townspeople for his bloodline. Of course, anyone with a working knowledge of 20th-century history knows that a bomb code-named "Little Boy" indeed ended the conflict in the Pacific Theatre, a plot point that appears to be the sole raison d'être for this contrived (ahem) little movie.

As the ginger-headed Pepper, newcomer Salvati registers boyish consternation admirably, his angelic face set in a perpetual state of perplexity. He's Macaulay Culkin with a lot on his mind. When required to pull out the emotional stops, however, Salvati's lack of actorly training shows, and (to be charitable) it's painful to witness. A host of familiarly faced character actors - Wilkinson, Levine, Chaplin - seemingly wander through the film with little purpose, seldom served well by director Monteverde's absent point of view. This is the rare instance these days in which a Mexican-born filmmaker helming an American movie completely misses the mark. For all its unsubtle sentimentality (including a you-can-see-it-from-a-mile-away plot twist), it remains unclear whether Little Boy intends to celebrate the conviction of belief or to mock it. It's an unfortunate confusion that permanently stunts its growth.

THE SALT OF THE EARTH D: Juliano Ribeiro Salgado, Wim Wenders. (PG-13, 110 min., subtitled)

For the past 40 years, Sebastião Salgado has been documenting human suffering and global conflicts, using his camera to record the heartbreak, the horror, and the toil of human existence in this modern world. From Serra Pelada, the massive gold mine in Brazil, to the burning oil fields of Kuwait after the first Gulf War, the photojournalist has captured indelible images. Initially educated as an economist, Salgado started taking photographs on his trips to Africa in the Sixties. before abandoning that career to shoot photos full time. The most compelling sections of The Salt of the Earth are when co-director Wim Wenders lets Salgado narrate the stories behind his most iconic photographs. And while Wenders and Juliano Salgado (Sebastião's son) sidestep the controversy of aestheticizing trauma and despair, there's no question that Salgado is a genius behind the camera. The years of globe-trotting to the most horrific places on Earth catch up with Salgado, and he felt that his soul was dying. Looking for a new project, he and his wife Léila (an integral creative partner whose minimal screen time in the film is a little troubling) come up with Genesis, documenting unblemished areas of the world, shooting wildlife and landscapes seemingly untouched since the dawn of time. The film also shows how the couple started the Instituto Terra, a successful reforestation project in his home country of Brazil. It's a remarkable life and a remarkable film, with images that linger long after you leave the theatre. The Salt of the Earth travels to the heart of darkness, but thankfully comes out on the other side and leaves you with a hopefulness that no matter what kind of madness and repression happen in the world, there is still hope for humanity.

THE AGE OF ADALINE

Many of us like to think that true love is timeless, but the notion is rarely flipped on its head. Born in 1908 - and living a normal enough life until a freak accident causes her to die, come back, and henceforth remain immune to the ravages of time - Adaline opts to become a career fugitive, renewing her identity and general emotional detachment every decade. On the surface, Age is a low-stakes, high-concept romance, gifted with warm cinematography and lush period trappings but director Lee Toland Krieger maintains a nimble grasp on the story's sense of magic realism, elevating this love story about the weight of time passing us by above recent Sparksian competition. AMERICAN SNIPER

With his best film since at least 2008's Gran Torino. Clint Eastwood revisits his long preoccupation with guns and their capabilities, although the recoil of American Sniper doesn't have the same moral reverb of Eastwood's finest work. Based on the memoir by Chris Kyle (Cooper, a dramatic revelation) - who, during the course of four tours in Iraq, became the most prolific sniper in the annals of U.S. military history - the film exists in a blackand-white world in which only good and evil abide. This sense of dichotomy, which served Kyle so well in combat, becomes a liability upon his difficult reentry into civilian life. Eastwood's touch is most clearly evident in the film's action sequences - packed with zealous clarity and tense dynamism - but American Sniper, to its credit, shows no interest in creating blind heroics and, instead, upholds the nickname Kyle earned in Iraq: the Legend. Chappie thrives on the perfectly silly transformation of an advanced technology into a common criminal, but the film strains to lend gravitas to its fairly lightweight premise. It may be hard to give much of a damn about the movie, but so long as the newly sentient Chappie is on screen - convincingly portrayed by Copley and a team of visual effects wizards it's surprisingly easy to give a damn about the machine. ROAD TO JUAREZ

Another pedestrian entry into the "petty criminals get in over their heads" subgenre of crime drama, Road to Juarez unnecessarily tries to confuse the audience, employing five time jumps in the first 10 minutes alone, in what turns out to be a pretty conventional narrative about friendship, kidnapping, and Mexican drug cartels. Jacob (Perez) and Robbie (Koontz) are shown in flashback stealing sodas in L.A., as kids, before we snap to the present

day as they hook up with Robbie's uncle. Doug (Forsythe). who hips them to his business of stealing film equipment from sets, and that quickly escalates into a kidnapping problem involving the wife of an incarcerated cartel kingpin. A half-baked thriller that looks pretty good and features performances that aren't half bad. A fairly straightforward chase thriller ensues, with plenty of fatherly sins from Jimmy's past falling on his son's unwitting shoulders. The film's main failing is an ultimate inability to distinguish itself by more than minor flourishes. Technophobia and its dehumanizing effect on flesh-andblood people has been seen in films at least since Charlie Chaplin got caught in the cogs of his 1936 masterpiece Modern Times. Now here's Unfriended, a not-awful creepout that's set entirely online and in real time, amidst the Facebook, Skyne, YouTube, Chatroulette, and Google Chat confabs among a group of teens and an unknown user who claims to be a friend of theirs who committed suicide a year before - with a laptop belonging to Blaire (Hennig) providing the window onto the "action," via the voveuristic view of the audience via the theatre screen (nicely meta, that). Russianborn director Levan Gabriadze's first genre entry, Unfriended provides a modicum of chills and more gore than you'd expect. THE WATER DIVINER

Russell Crowe directs his first narrative feature and it turns out to be a sprawling historical epic ("inspired by actual events") that involves multiple continents, 17 million dead, the Battle of Gallipoli, forbidden love, and brothers (literally) in arms. Crowe knows what he wants ... and what he wants. apparently, is too much. After losing three teenage sons to Australia's infamous Gallipoli campaign, and his wife Eliza, to suicide, Australian farmer Joshua Connor (Crowe), who's able to sense subterranean rivers below the arid outback countryside, yows to travel to the Ottoman Empire to divine the location of his children's bones - a one-man crusade that runs afoul of every roadblock imaginable. Although it features some breathtaking cinematography, The Water Diviner is bogged down by a plot that seems to have no end. Given the choice, I'll take Peter Weir's profoundly devastating Gallipoli over Crowe's earnest bombast any day. (04/24/2015)

WHAT WE DO IN THE SHADOWS

Co-director, writer, and lead Jemaine Clement was, famously, one of the creators and stars of Flight of the Conchords, and with this pointed send-up of Twilight tropes and undead issues, he brings a similar, faux-naif comic sensibility to the semi-moribund vampire genre. Set up as a fake documentary, an all-but-unseen film crew records the nightly routines of a group of vampire flatmates in Wellington, New Zealand: medieval-torture-loving Vladislav (Clement): former 18th century dandy Viago (Waititi): borderline-feral wild child Deacon (Brugh); and 8,000-year-old Max Schreck lookalike Petyr (Fransham). A newly turned but not yet fully accepted vampire named Nick (Gonzalez-Macer) and his nerd-pal Stu (Rutherford) round out the ensemble of losers through the ages. A gently parodic tone prevails in what is ultimately a pretty sweet take on bloodsuckers. As friends their own age (Dizzia and former Beastie Boy Horovitz) find themselves consumed by domestic responsibilities. Josh and Cornelia are eager to fill that social void with walking, talking reminders of their own waning potential. The result isn't entirely riotous, yet Baumbach weaves in plenty of droll observations about the bittersweet burden of middle age and the millennial tendency to transform yesterday's nostalgia into today's kitsch. Despite a few stumbles, While We're Young tackles admirably the struggle of reconciling its protagonists' rival impulses to either welcome an unexpected source of youthful vitality with open arms or embrace such an individual so as to better displace them from one's lawn. Gustav Klimt's spectacular painting Portrait of Adele Bloch-Bauer I far outshines this pedestrian movie about the legal battle waged by Maria Altmann (Mirren), the niece of the portrait's subject, to regain possession of the work which was seized from her family by the Nazis during their takeover of Austria. Based on true events, the film recounts the process by which Altmann, long since relocated to California, and her inexperienced lawyer Randy Schoenberg (Reynolds), fought in the Austrian and American courts to win back the painting, along with five other Klimts. Mirren's performance is beyond reproach - as always - but even she can't redeem Woman in Gold's wan drama and fixed characterizations. (04/10/2015)

Elaine May: A New Leaf (1971) COMEDY

Trailblazing comedienne and comic director Elaine May wrote, directed, and starred in this wonderfully weird comedy as a mousy heiress preyed upon by an impoverished playboy with murderous designs (Walter Matthau, that legendary slob, playing against type as an elitist snob). When Paramount Pictures recut the movie, May tried to block it from release - she'd envisioned a much nastier satire - but what made it to screen is pretty charming: an arsenic-laced sweet treat. - Kimberley Jones

Anna May Wong: Shanghai Express (1932)

DIRECTOR'S WALL (VON STERNBERG) AND HONG KONG

Hollywood's first Asian-American star is barely remembered today, but Wong remains as alluring, exotic, and sensually hypnotic as she was when she starred alongside Marlene Dietrich in Josef von Sternberg's rip-roaring melodrama Shanghai Express. Anti-miscegenation laws and the career-stifling Hays Code had previously led her, like Louise Brooks, to Europe, but Wong returned for Shanghai Express, and her performance nearly blows Dietrich off the screen. - Marc Savlov

Martha Marcy May Marlene (2011) DRAMA

Elizabeth Olsen gives a riveting performance as Martha, a young woman fleeing a Manson-like cult in the Catskill Mountains. Plagued by memories and trauma, Martha's shaky attempts to re-assimilate into society and reconnect with her older sister. Lucy (Sarah Paulson) are juxtaposed with flashbacks to her time in the cult, run by a supremely creepy John Hawkes. Director Sean Durkin's visually beautiful film carefully builds to one of the most paranoiac and haunting endings in recent memory. - Josh Kupecki

May Fools (1990) **DIRECTOR'S WALL (MALLE)**

The relatives gather at their family's estate in the French countryside for the funeral of their matriarch, whose burial must be postponed because of a gravediggers' strike. Set during the May 1968 student uprising in Paris, this comedy of manners is set against the winds of change blowing outside its gates. Michel Piccoli heads the gathered mourners as they bicker over politics, vie for heirlooms, and otherwise mix and match in one of the great Louis Malle's - Marjorie Baumgarten last films.

Bavu Blakes Carpes the Diem

As City Council deliberated housing bonds late Thursday afternoon, a conglomeration of rappers and junior high students amassed in the lobby of City Hall.

Soon the Council's chambers were shoulderto-shoulder with several hundred spectators there to witness a proclamation designating April 23 as Bavu Blakes Day.

When Mayor Steve Adler called his name, the

local MC - elder statesman to Austin's blossoming hip-hop scene and teacher of seventh graders in Manor – sprang up to the blissful beat of his 2012 single "Big Bright Future." Running the floor while rapping, he commanded 15 students from **Decker Middle School** who danced and sang the track's hook:

"I got a big, bright future ahead of me."

Triumphant and electric, Blake's performance brought the sizable crowd – suits and gold chains alike - to their feet. Following applause that felt endless, the celebrant

> addressed Austin's new civic leader: "We still doing this next week, Mr. Adler?"

"We'll book you a regular gig here," grinned Adler. "We've never sold out before!"

It's not remotely unusual for the city to honor musicians with their own day.

Since 1993, when the tradition began, nearly 700 bands or artists ranging from Grammy winners to cover bands, have garnered such honors. Yet Blakes' day exhibited particular poignancy, not only for his leadership qualifications in the realms of music, education, and spirituality, but also because his performance tore the damn roof off City Hall.



"Eight years ago, I had a chance to do something exactly like this, but on a different day of a different year, so I turned it down because I thought it was corny," announced Blakes, an Austin fixture since the Nineties. "Now I understand, and I confirmed it coming here today; that it's really about the bigger picture - to bring a whole community and different generations together."

Accordingly, he gave the mayor instruction. "If any artist comes in here and takes [the plaque] for themselves, you should just snatch it back because we are representing for Austin as a whole."

Shakey Graves' Close-Up

Live videos document Shakev Graves' ascent from local obscurity to international fame. In 2012, his taping with local concert capturers the Good Music Club led to a sponsorship from The Loar guitars. The following year, in-studio sessions produced by Chicago's Audiotree went viral.

Within the last six months, the 27-year-old Austin native showcased on Conan and Letterman, and on Wednesday approaches a zenith of music videography with his debut taping for Austin City Limits.

"It's certainly burned in my memory," he says of KLRU's 41-year-old music show, which he observed transitioning from an Americana production at Studio 6A to hosting diversified styles on the futuristic Moody Theater stage.

"I think it's far more relevant now than when I was growing up, and that applies to why I'm so proud to do it," offers Graves. "Certain things in Austin feel like they're running away with the ball and not being true to themselves, but Austin City Limits has gotten sweeter with age."

ACL Executive Producer Terry Lickona first beheld the singer at Lustre Pearl.

"I had no idea who he was and nobody else seemed to be paying much attention to him," he recalls. "As one-man bands go, he was amazing, but I would hesitate to book something like that because most people would've thought of it as a novelty act."

Noting Graves' development as an artist and, no doubt, his inclusion of bandmates, Lickona offered him an ACL taping after a gig at Stubb's last October. Graves calls it a "dream come true."

"This is part of my city, my heart, and my culture - it's all very close to the chest. I'm not going to use it to promote an album or show off," says Graves, who admits his constantly evolving live show recently generated confusion with concertgoers only familiar with "Dearly Departed."

"I see this as a freeze frame of where I am. I don't know where this is going, but I know where it's come from and I think this is a pretty perfect crossroads."

MOST GIGS: "The incomparable **Bruce Hughes**. Whether with his own band or playing Mondays with Bob Schneider, Sundays with the Resentments. or Wednesdays with Johnny Nicholas, Bruce is an incredible talent and family."

MOST DANGEROUS STUNT: "One night when Paula Nelson was booked, she and her good friend Jeff Schwan, a professional movie stunt man. planned a little extracurricular activity during her performance. Earlier in the day, Jeff had brought in a breakaway table, beer bottles, et cetera, and planted them in front of the stage. Later that night, while she was singing with her band, he walks up in a disguise and starts heckling her. When he steps up onstage, Paula, a Taekwondo black belt, kicked him and he flew off the stage onto the table. No one in the audience knew it was staged, including our door staff. They dragged Jeff out of there in a not-sofriendly way."

Rusty held court every Thursday night for 16 years and sold a lot of tequila for us. He also demonstrated an amazing ability to perform whether he was fighting an illness or mourning the loss of his mother earlier that day. For Rusty, the show always went on."

MOST MEMORABLE NIGHT: "In the fall of 2004. there was a political fundraiser booked at the Austin Music Hall. Stephen Bruton had asked me for a booking on that particular night and invited all his friends over after the event ended. On that night, the Saxon stage included Stephen, Eric Johnson, Bonnie Raitt, Mickey Raphael, and Michael McDonald."

To Have and Have Not

Joe Pug navigates troubadour truths

Scuffed just enough to deem credible, Joe Pug's carpenter boots were a strategic detail rounding out his heartland rocker veneer: worn jeans, white undershirt, hard-shell guitar case. Neil Young once wore similar footwear, their workingman's weight fortifying his blue-collar persona. During the four years Pug lived in Chicago, those lived-in steel toes were as trusty an accessory as the open-mic drifter's acoustic six-string.

Then 23, the North Carolina migrant advanced a city whose music scene comprised cliques of longtime locals. Save for his lunch-bucket image, the budding folksinger remained otherwise evasive. Today, the five-year Austinite born Joe Pugliese has paired his flannel button-down with cowboy boots.

He's at ease in a vinyl booth at Gourmands, the bar's

floors a two-toned sprawl below stillstrung Christmas lights. Neighboring his Eastside domicile, the homey gastropub marks the Maryland native's go-to locale. Up north, the once aspiring playwright worked in construction. He'd moved to the Second City on a whim, after scrapping college two semesters shy of earning a theatre degree. Directionless and disenchanted, he soon traveled a pair of longfamiliar avenues.

"I'd literally go straight from job sites, building walls and floors, to playing open mics - Timberlands and all," he smiles. "If this music thing ever lit on fire and the wheels fell off, I'd go right back

into construction."

Pug often cut his University of North Carolina classes to frequent the campus library, where he'd spiral through Hemingway, gorging on Fitzgerald, Carver, and Dos Passos. Now three albums deep, his lyrics exude literary influence, fictively rich with wartime imagery and hymnal prose. Steinbeck and Whitman's thumb prints are as palpable as Dylan and Prine's.

The handyman's debut EP, 2008's startlingly poetic Nation of Heat, propelled him toward revered Windy City venues like the Double Door, plus an opening slot supporting Steve Earle.

"This might make me sound like a jackass," cautions Pug, "but I knew there was something special about the songs I was writing at that time. I was on fire. On board the Holy Spirit freight train."

Conceding that while vigorous touring yields a staunch following nationwide, his home base may have taken the hit. "We've yet to have that big Austin show. That show where

everything clicks."

Overcast calm belies the underlying edge of this pre-South by Southwest Sunday. Soon, Pug will preview his third album Windfall in-store at Waterloo Records, teaser local gig to his quartet's record release show at Red 7. The new LP outsold its predecessor in pre-orders alone.

In the store's parking lot, the songsmith slides into the driver's seat of his band's slightly seedy 2001 Chevy Express tour van. Behind him, evidence of an on-the-road existence lies scattered: a container of engine oil, halfempty Coke bottles, stocked merch bin. A parcel of untouched hardcovers protrudes.

"Some guy sent me his novel!" exclaims the singer, incredulous. "A fan briefly mentioned it to me after my show one night. Next thing I know, this huge box shows up

at my front door! I don't know what to do with them all."

Above piercing, ice-blue eyes, his brow furrows.

"Maybe I shouldn't have given him my home address."

Playing solo, the chambray-clad singer charms a dense crowd; many sing softly along with older songs. He speaks often and amiably between tunes. As usual, Nation's fingerpicked "Hymn 101" stuns supreme, as the troubadour vows: "The more I buy the more I'm bought / The more I'm bought the less I cost."

"Wow," mouths a guy nearby. Unlike most others clapping, he simply bows his head.

Austin signifies a clean slate for Pug and his now fiancée. a fellow musician and eighth-grade teacher. In 2010, the former high school sweethearts reconnected after nearly a decade apart. With her living in D.C., the couple shot south to start anew.

"Austin's the city for at-heart Texans who aren't voting for Mitt Romney anytime soon," quips the soon-to-be bridegroom.

Playing 180 club gigs annually, he's home roughly half of each vear.

"I tour like guys in the Fifties and Sixties did," compares Pug, citing Carl Perkins and Elvis' "Vaudeville-like" approach. "You've gotta get your hands dirty in this business. I meet the promoters, I pump the gas. I'm also the guy in the broom closet at the end of each night counting \$20 bills with the bar manager.

"I walk into venues with my clipboard," he continues. "I meet the production manager, talk with the merchandise



handler. Sometimes, it's not until I hop onstage for soundcheck a half hour later that the staff realizes I'm the same guy whose name's on their marquee!"

The avid reader loosely quotes late sci-fi author Robert Heinlein, who notably insisted a person should be as able to build a wall and butcher a hog as he is to write a sonnet or cook a meal.

"Renaissance knowledge is pretty badass," concludes Pug, conceding that while vigorous touring yields a staunch following nationwide, his home base may have taken the hit. "We've yet to have that big Austin show. That show where everything clicks."

BON APPÉTIT

Two days prior to his 31st birthday, the singer hosts a small celebration at his modest home. The smoky savor of slow-cooked barbecued pork wafts. Nearby, Pug's manager produces a Ziploc of sumac-seeped meat rub, the fellow Chicago transplant prudently handling the clear baggie like pricey primo dope.

The pair discovered Silkworm bassist Tim Midyett's seasoning after reading famed Chicago producer Steve Albini's epicurean nod in Bon Appétit. A cloud of grill smoke suddenly engulfs the table.

"Your comfort will be sacrificed for the integrity of this barbecue," shrugs Pug.

Waxing wistful in light of his birth anniversary, he brandishes a bottle of mezcal - a gift - emptying a small pour for himself before coolly concealing it from his thirsty guests. He checks the dimming sky for rain clouds, of which suddenly there are many.

"This new album's no different than my last," he considers. "Except now, my band has a few more years under our belts. That's an asset for my style of music. 'Singersongwriters,' as opposed to indie-rock groups, start hitting their strides around age 35, riding that sweet-spot of creativity well into their 50s.

"Take Tom Petty," he poses. "Or Lucinda Williams, or Neko Case. The albums those artists made at those ages mark their glory days. Good songwriting takes time. Articulating what you want to say - and well - is hard. Not everyone realizes that."

Pug's acuity in propria persona matches the maturity of his lyrics. He's an old soul, but bears a sprightly, slightly formulaic work track.

"Everything's moving in the right direction," he reflects, emptying his glass. "No matter how long it sometimes feels to be taking. Finally though, I'm seeing eight years of hard work pay off."

Joe Pug nearly walked away from music following 2012's sophomore LP The Great Despiser, so the local songwriter's new effort comes as both a welcome return and deliberate evolution. His familiar personal poignancy and darker hues still drive the songs, but Windfall achieves a more polished sense of melody from the outset on the paired opening of "Bright Beginnings" and "Veteran Fighter." An easy patience then exudes throughout, seeding chronicles of doubt and struggle with a hopeful, determined lift. On "The Measure," Pug calmly drawls, "All we've lost is nothing to what we've found." Centerpiece "Great Hosannas" chants through a malaise of phrases worn trite by an overexposed culture, while "O My Chesapeake" plows a poetic longing in rural nostalgia. Despite the struggle, closer "If Still It Can't Be Found," with Wilco's Pat Sansone on Mellotron, delivers affirmation as Pug finds motivation and a new beginning.



Fool to Care

Boz Scaggs' head music

For decades, Boz Scaggs remained best known for 1976 smash Silk Degrees, his seventh LP, which featured Top 40 radio staples "Lowdown" and "Lido Shuffle." He grew up in Plano, then moved to San Francisco in the late Sixties where he joined the Steve Miller Band. Now 70, the rightly heralded singer, songwriter, and guitarist hit a creative high note on

Working with producer/drummer Steve Jordan (Eric Clapton, Keith Richards, John Mayer) and a backing band including bassist Willie Weeks (Rolling Stones, Stevie Wonder) and guitarist Ray Parker Jr. (Ghostbusters!), he paid tribute to that city's soul heritage, especially the tandem of Al Green and producer Willie Mitchell. Newly issued Fool to Care follows the same blueprint, Scaggs hinting it's the second of a trilogy. This time, he and Jordan traveled to Nashville with the same band and employed Music City sidemen like steel guitar all-star Paul Franklin and guitarist Reggie Young.

People are immediately drawn to the pair of duets on the disc, one with Bonnie Raitt and the other starring Lucinda Williams, yet the songs, some familiar, some not, and the way Scaggs puts them across takes the listener on a tour of the South, with the sounds of Texas, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Louisiana all mixed into something characteristically smooth and listenable. He spoke by phone from his home in Sonoma County, California.

Austin Chronicle: One surprising aspect about Fool to Care is little-known songs written by artists people would recognize. How did you go about deciding which songs

Boz Scaggs: The main criteria is whether it's a song I can sink my teeth into, one that suits my voice and that I can give an interpretation that it's perhaps not seen before. I look at material from all genres just out of curiosity and a general passion for music. I have a small studio that I can flesh them out in. I try out my voice and see how it feels in there. That's part of the process. Then Steve and I pitch songs at each other before we start recording. I've gone through this process for a number of years now. It's become sort of a general pastime. So I have a list that I've compiled for various reasons, like when I performed with Michael McDonald and Donald Fagen as the Dukes of September.

AC: Y'all played Austin in 2012.

BS: That was an extended process of looking for material with two aficionados. That was a great pleasure. That got me started and kept me going at it, so I have these lists. I'm

not sure how many songs I considered for this project, probably less than 100, but a lot of things pass under my nose sorting these lists out. I collaborate with Steve and when we hit the studio I probably have 15 or 16 songs from day one. It's a pretty intensive process. AC: The last record was recorded in

Memphis. This time you moved to Nashville. What was the reasoning behind those choices?

BS: We went to Memphis for a very specific reason: Royal Recording Studio [home of Green and Mitchell]. It had a sound. There are very few decisions to be made in recording there to get that sound. After working there with a core group, it made sense to try and expand the sonic palette,

and be a little more far reaching in the material. That led us to consider New York, Los Angeles, and Nashville. Because of the nature of the song list, as it took shape, it looked like Nashville would be the place. It was comfortable. I'd never made a record there. Steve had, and he recommended a studio that had a lot of goodies that recording artists like.

AC: There's a series of songs in the middle of the album where the mood seems to change. You cover Huey "Piano" Smith's "High Blood Pressure," a fun rock & roll number, then segue into Al Green's "Full of Fire." The latter reminds me of some of your best-known material, like "Lowdown." It's funky yet smooth, and after the rhythm and blues sounds that precede it, I found it surprising to hear you slip so easily back into that.

BS: With that rhythm section, I felt like I could go anywhere I wanted to go. Jordan brought that song in. He and I have a particular affinity for Al Green songs. Over the course of my career I've recorded a handful of them. I feel like sometimes he's a lucky charm. But it's always a mountain to climb for me. He's one of the great singers. I don't think I would have chosen that song for the record, but Jordan made me do it. To walk in Al Green's footsteps is formidable.

AC: Also surprising is the falsetto you go into on Curtis Mayfield's "I'm So Proud." Was that a difficult song to tackle?

BS: I've been singing that song since I first heard it. It's one of my all-time favorite songs. Curtis had a thing called a head voice. It's something between a natural voice and a falsetto, technically. It takes a singer to an unusual place. It takes getting used to hearing your voice back like that, but it has to be done when you're doing Curtis Mayfield.

AC: You grew up in the Dallas area.

BS: I moved to Plano when I was about 10.

AC: I understand one of your early influences was a radio show from Dallas called Cat's Caravan. What do you remember about that? That was the beginning of the rock & roll era,

BS: That's right. In the Dallas area, as in urban areas everywhere, we had all kinds of radio, but Top 40's king when you're 11. At WRR, they had a disc jockey named Jim Lowe, who had a regular late-night show. He was some sort of professor or academic. He took the roots of the music and talked about where it came from, like New Orleans or Memphis. Some originated in the Mississippi delta. It was fascinating for me to learn where the music came from and it gave a lot of us an appreciation. It influenced a lot of musicians I know.

AC: You're doing something similar with these last two albums you've made - turning people on to different styles. **BS:** Opening doors is a lot of what music is all about.

AC: Did you know Doug Sahm when he was in San Francisco?

BS: I did. I ran into him about a year after I got there in 1967. He came out with the Honkey Blues Band, he called it. There were so many musicians that came there around that time from Texas, Chicago, and New Orleans as well.

AC: Recently you were quoted as saying, "What I'm doing now is part of what I've been looking for since I got started."

career that I have a

is and I can go for it."

BS: I feel strongly about that. I have a freedom that I never had. I'm a better musician. I feel closer to my voice, closer to my guitar. I'm beginning to realize that I'm closer to the music. It's not just an external part of me. I've internalized it in a very satisfying way over the years. I'm at a point in

my career that I have a sense of what my style is and I can go for it. I'm still curious and I feel free. I found a great collaborator in Steve Jordan. We're always looking for those collaborations. I'm in a good place.



THE SONICS This Is the Sonics (Revox USA)

When the Sonics last cut an LP, the Beatles, Bob Dylan, and Rolling Stones were redefin-



ing popular music, and the Vietnam War continued escalating. Saxophonist Rob Lind, one of three original Sonics in the current lineup, eventually shipped out to southeast Asia as a fighter pilot. Fifty years later, the Tacoma proto-punks are still recording in the red and in mono, with original producer Buck Ormsby replaced by Detroit studio genius Jim Diamond. They're more punk at 70 than a truckload of Sex Pistols 45s, and still decimate every other band in your record collection. The Hoodoo Gurus ("Be a Woman") and Eighties-era Kinks ("The Hard Way") get covered alongside Willie Dixon ("You Can't Judge a Book by the Cover") and Marty Robbins ("Sugaree"), all as rave-ups. Jerry Roslie retains the most tonsil-shredding scream in recorded history, and Larry Parypa's guitar continues to peel paint. Fealty to any band of aging delinquents whose idea of social protest is a song called "Save the Planet," featuring the payoff line, "It's the only one with beer!" (The Sonics scorch Red 7 on Sunday, June 14.)

DEATH CAB FOR CUTIE Kintsugi (Atlantic)

The 2012 divorce of Ben Gibbard and She & Him's Zooey Deschanel, plus the late-game departure of



BJÖRK Vulnicura (One Little Indian/Megaforce)

After a painful divorce, Björk Guðmundsdóttir invites us to dig through the pieces of her broken heart before choosing sides. The Icelandic won-



der always demonstrates exceptional taste in collaborators, here aligning herself with space-pop producer Arca (FKA Twigs, Kanye West), and dark ambient auteur the Haxan Cloak. Though she still struggles to deliver lyrics melodically, Vulnicura pops expertly. After the tuneless, vague sounds of 2011's Biophilia, this fresh mix of Arca's fractured bloopage and string arrangements by Björk herself are a welcome upgrade. Moving chronologically through the couple's split, beginning with elegantly sad highlight "Stonemilker," on which "synchronizing our feelings" is as hard as "milking a stone," the album all but peaks on the post-breakup drama of "Atom Dance," an aching duet with the angel-voiced Antony. Björk slowly realizes she will survive, climaxing in her best new song: "Quicksand." She puts the diva as divorcée over in a forceful mix of lush strings, boom-bap bass, and skittering beats. As she sings, "When I'm broken I am whole and when I'm whole I'm broken," you can rest assured her army of "me" is back in full force.

EARL SWEATSHIRT I Don't Like Shit, I Don't Go Outside (Columbia)

Spawned by a poet/ activist and a civil rights-



minded law professor, and mentored by riotinciting Tyler, the Creator, Earl Sweatshirt finally reconciles those influences and the voices inside his own head on sophomore effort I Don't Like Shit, I Don't Go Outside. At peak high and mid-puff, "Huey" sparks a mad stream of consciousness. "I'm toasted as hell," he admits. "And I got to jot it quick 'cause I can't focus so well." The first half of the album, submerged in production as thick as embryonic fluid, finds the 21-year-old L.A. rapper missing his grandmother ("Grief"), while agonizing over what he owes his mom - who shipped him off to boarding school following the release of debut mixtape *Earl* to keep him out of trouble. Unlike his star-studded debut LP Doris. Sweatshirt limits four guests to the second half of the disc. A\$AP Mob attaché DA\$H helps Sweatshirt assert his independence on "Grown Ups," Ratking's Wiki's quirky lisp makes the perfect foil to Earl's bottled-up verse on "AM // Radio." and Long Beach spitter Vince Staples brings out Sweatshirt's most emphatic delivery. (Earl

THE WHO Frank Erwin Center, April 27

Zak Richard Starkey - son of Richard Starkey Jr. - has now powered the Who longer than Keith Moon, his godfather. (That's 1996-2015 and 1964-1978, respectively.) The group's Tasmanian drum demon counted Ringo Starr among his closest friends. Monday night at the Frank Erwin Center, Moony was alive and quakin' in the maelstrom of Starkey.

The Who without Moon and late partner in rhythm, bassist John Entwistle, (that's 1946-1978 and 1944-2002, respectively) remains akin to John and Paul without George, and Richard Starkey Jr., Daltrey, and Townshend employ five backers besides Zak Starkey: a tall, stoic geezer in dark specs much like his predecessor on bass, Welshman Giuseppe Henry "Pino" Palladino, plus two additional guitarists (one of them Townshend's "younger, better-looking brother Simon," according to Pete), and a pair of keyboardists.

Zak Starkey out-Who'd them all, including Roger and Pete.

Daltrey's voice rose up and out in better shape than any other period since the first Who farewell tour in 1982. Its 71 years couldn't recede back to 1971 for Who's Next essentials "Behind Blue Eyes," "Baba O'Riley," and "Won't Get Fooled Again," but classic rock radio wore the tar out of those anthems - a term overused in the rock lexicon, only the Who invented the very form - so the band still performs them out of obligation rather than gusto. That was hardly the point, however.

Rather, mid-Sixties pop hits "The Seeker," "The Kids Are Alright," and "Pictures of Lily" found the frontman once again sounding like a kid, alright. "A Quick One, While He's Away," whose "mini-opera" Townshend, 69. acknowledged as the precursor for grander concepts (the Who invented the rock opera as well), sorely missed Moon and Entwistle's completing the song's barbershop quartet harmonies, but Daltrey's still-broad shoulders carried the tune to giddy pleasure, its Vaudevillian oom-pah and Hopalong Cassidy clip-clop lacking only copious pints and a pub brawl at its conclusion.

Segue into Tommy's "Amazing Journey" and "Sparks" then kicked in the Owsley acid like 1968-69 all over again.

Townshend, too, was on, beginning with his windmill-accented guitar manhandling on "The Seeker." He injected Live at Leeds prowess into "My Generation," and the palpable whiff of punk edging 1981's "You Better You Bet" ("our most recent hit," cracked Townshend) egged Daltrey to near vocal gnashing.

Starkey, who turns 50 in September, doesn't begin to ape Moon's one-continuousfill tempest. His style lays back deceptively before becoming an avalanche of sticks and stone cold beats raining down like a meteor shower. During the ancient tribal rumblings of "Magic Bus," he adopted his dad's ambidextrous style, arms at his sides pounding like a runner pistoning through a race. Following Townshend through the Tommy mini-set, Starkey re-lit the material's primal rage.

Too many moments transcended throughout the two-hours-nearly-to-the-minute performance: Townshend's acoustic intro (on a local Collins guitar, maybe) for Quadrophenia's "I'm One" and Daltrey's tour de force summoning of album-mate "Love, Reign O'er Me"; Townshend ending the encore-less show saluting, "Austin, music fucking capital of the fucking world"; and the universality of the "listening to you" segment in Tommy's "See Me, Feel Me," which confirms its author's contention in the Lambert & Stamp documentary opening in Austin on Friday, wherein he says we thought the songs were about him, but they were, in fact, about us - the audience.



Zappa Plays Zappa

EMO'S, FRIDAY 1

Avant-rock composer, guitarist, bandleader Frank Zappa died from prostate cancer in 1993, but his music remains alive thanks to his eldest son Dweezil. This time through town, the sextet re-creates the last album attributed to the Mothers of Invention, One Size Fits All, marking 40 years since its release.

"To a degree, it's being introduced to a new audience," says the guitarist. "There's nothing out there like it. That, in and of itself, is quite an accomplishment. There's not too many people you can say created a style that's unique to them. Frank's definitely one of them. He created a system to be able to make music that pretty much has the feel of a living breathing entity because every time you play it, it's a new adventure. We can play [opener] 'Inca Roads' every night and it's going to be different every time."

There will be a second set as well, featuring music from every period of Zappa's strange and wonderful career. The younger Zappa, 45, also brings his afternoon guitar class, Dweezilla, to Emo's, before the sound check. It's a chance for guitarists of all levels to get some insight from the two-time Grammy winner.

"A few years ago, I started a three-day total immersion guitar camp with that name, but I've been busy, so I haven't been able to do the camp the last couple of years. I took what I did from the camp and bring it on the road. People can come and get a sense of what I worked on to change my approach to guitar playing. I concentrate on exploring what you can change with what you know.

"People plateau after playing for a certain time and I give them ideas that free them from the boxes they might find themselves in." – Jim Caligiuri

SEVENTH ANNUAL

Austin's venerable pervo-punks fire up the fryer once more for a 10-band sweatfest benefiting the Bill Hicks Foundation for Wildlife. Statesman, Saturday 2

Stretching two minutes of action into a day of hype, hope, and hullabaloo is the Kentucky Derby way. Austin's socialites and mint julep masses gallop down to the Statesman parking lot (305 S. Congress) for Saturday's Derby City Music Fest. Odds favor local indie bard Shakey Graves to headline the concert (8:25pm), with hippie bluegrass vets Leftover Salmon just a length behind (6:55pm). Speedster string band Whiskey Shivers (3:45pm), one-man band Possessed By Paul James (2:30pm), and browngrassers Sour Bridges (1:30pm) all jockey for position.

LOCAL H, **BATTLEME**

Holy Mountain, Sunday 3

Recently saluting their 25th year in rock, Chicago post-grunge innovators Local H dropped eighth effort Hey, Killer earlier this month. Fronted by founder and group mainstay Scott Lucas, who adds bass pickups to his guitar in lieu of a bassist, the duo's 11-track wit rocker marks the first to feature new drummer Rvan Harding. Preceding the pair's hard rock battering are former locals Battleme. Now Portland ground, the folk-flecked artrock foursome is fronted by ex-Lions singer Matt Drenik. - Neph Basedow

DIAMOND RUGS Belmont, Monday 4

Diamond Rugs' eponymous 2012 LP whiffed of a one-off indie supergroup affair, a brilliantly raw and fun gathering of Deer Tick's John McCauley and Robbie Crowell, Black Lips' Ian St. Pé, Los Lobos' Steve Berlin, Dead Confederate's T. Hardy Morris, and Six Finger Satellite's Bryan Dufresne. The 24-year-old British singer-songwriter stepped on a media land mine last week as he prepared for his summer world tour for sophomore LP x, when a video of the guitarist rapping a homophobic verse made headlines - said by his press agent to be satire on the condition of hip-hop. Two things are apparent upon reading the controversial verse: Sheeran's no homophobe, and definitely not an MC. - Nina Hernandez

STEPHIN MERRITT Central Presbyterian Church, Wednesday 6

Magnetic Fields songwriting dynamo Stephin Merritt is the rare bird who mines tragicomic pathos from artfully phrased folk rambles that would come off as ostentatious parlor trickery in lesser hands. Equal parts poignant, pithy, erudite, and inscrutable, he never telegraphs his next move. Latest salvo All My Little Words is a Scrabble-inspired book of poems based on two-letter words. Should people even get married anymore?


- Ricky
