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






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

James has lived with us since he was 10 months old. I am 73 and my wife is 65. Because of the lack of funds, James cannot move to a group home nearby to us while we are still able to help him make the transition.

I am empathic with families that have relatives in state-run schools; change is always difficult.

However, there can be little doubt that the community model is far superior in terms of dollars spent to care for a client and overall quality of life for the individuals.

Since we either can't or won't provide funds to care for all of this portion of our people, we have to face this problem now. The waiting list is growing. The time for hard decisions is at hand. You do the math; the data is available. Your newspaper's empathy for those that are faced with change if their school is closed is admirable, but life is filled with difficult choices. Sometimes we are faced with choosing the lesser of two unattractive options. I ask you to take a hard look at this issue and consider those of us "waiting" on the waiting list.

EADLINES

CITY COUNCIL MEETS today (June 11) with a heavy (28-case) zoning agenda, a couple of public hearings, and some Council proposals that could generate sparks: a property-tax freeze for the elderly and disabled, more designated funding for low-income assistance programs, and a move to create a "sobriety center" to reduce public intoxication arrests.

EARLY WORD ON the bag-ban report by Austin Resource Recovery - to be presented to the Zero Waste Advisory Commission Wednesday - is that the two-year-old ban on most single-use plastic bags is working well. According to a statement released Tuesday by the Texas Campaign for the Environment, ARR's review found that the ban has dramatically reduced Austin's bag litter and bag waste, while saving money in the recycling process.

MCKINNEY CORPORAL ERIC casebolt, a

10-year veteran of the MPD, resigned Tuesday after his actions in subduing a group of teenagers at a McKinney pool party – throwing people to the ground and brandishing his gun - were recorded and generated a nationwide backlash (as well as defenses). Casebolt had been placed on administrative leave.

THE BODY FOUND floating in Lady Bird Lake Sunday morning has been identified as recent University of North Texas graduate Julio Santos. KXAN reported Tuesday that the medical examiner found no "suspicious trauma," but the investigation is ongoing. Santos was last seen alive in front of Barbarella after 2am Friday.

TWO LOCAL AFFORDABLE housing agencies could soon be broke, according to a county Auditor's Office report. The Housing Authority of Travis County and the Strategic Housing Finance Corporation may be insolvent within 15 months as funds dropped more than \$2 million from 2012-14, the Austin Monitor reported.

FORMER AUSTIN STATE Rep. Glen Maxey,

the first openly gay member of the Texas House, offered a wry response to (unmarried) presidential wannabe South Carolina Sen. Lindsey Graham's declaration that - should he be elected president -"I've got a lot of friends - we could have a rotating first lady." Maxey posted to Facebook: "If Lindsey needs a rotating lady, maybe I could apply. I've been grand marshal of the Texas Gay Rodeo ... And I rotate very nicely."

WHILE ANTI-LGBT ACTIVIST groups. including Texas Eagle Forum and Texas Values. urged Gov. Greg Abbott to call a special session to revive a failed 2015 legislative session bill barring county clerks from issuing same-sex marriage licenses, it looks like Abbott won't grant their request. "They got their job done on time, and don't require any overtime," Abbott told WOAI news radio.





The Appraisal Scam ... Updated

TCAD DISPUTES THE CITY'S NUMBERS, BUT THE CHALLENGE MARCHES ON

The Travis Central Appraisal District has fired back.

In a report titled "Commercial Valuation Analysis" (released May 26), TCAD analysts

have responded to the report ("An Analysis of TCAD's Commercial Valuations for City of Austin") prepared for the city by consultants George Gau of UT-Austin's Dept. of Finance and Robert S. Radebaugh of the Aegis Group. The TCAD analysis is not exactly laudatory; it sharply questions the report's purpose and design, its methods, and even its

arithmetic. "After reviewing the analysis," write TCAD Chief Appraiser Marya Crigler and her colleagues, "it became apparent that several items in the statistical analysis were vague, potentially misrepresented, and painted a picture that wasn't what was

being described by the Council, County Commissioner [Brigid Shea], and Mayor [Steve Adler]."

As Crigler, et al., see it, the numbers fly-

ing around speculating about the extent of commercial "undervaluations" ranging from 40% overall to more than 90% for unimproved land - are way off the mark, and may be encouraging unrealistic expectations about the amount of untaxed commercial value just waiting to be accrued (thereby lightening the load on residential homesteads). Based

on their review – admittedly, pending access to the consultants' data on sales prices they say they've winnowed the apparent "undervaluations" to about 16%, and that by accounting for the apparent arithmetical problems, the differences shrink to about 10.5%. Crigler told me Wednesday, "That's within the standards allowed for commercial appraisals."

NOT PLUG 'N' PLAY

Since I was among those welcoming the apparent discrepancies in Travis County commercial valuations identified in the Gau/Radebaugh report ("Point Austin: The Appraisal Scam," May 22), it's only fair to acknowledge that the TCAD response (fairly blistering, in its bureaucratic way) has made me much more cautious about just how much additional value will be revealed by the city's current challenge petition, and whether - as former state Rep. Glen Maxey liked to say - "the squeeze will be worth the juice." The Appraisal Review Board is scheduled to hear the challenge on June 22, and Crigler says, "We've never had one before, so I don't know how long it will take."

For his part, Mayor Adler is optimistic, saying that once the city and TCAD begin actually "sharing the data" (instead of just reading each other's summary reports), there will be meeting in the middle. He's convinced that the challenge process can be completed without disrupting the calendar for adopting the city budget and (handin-hand) the property tax rate; several of the smaller Travis County jurisdictions that depend for their budgets on a TCADcertified property tax roll have expressed nervousness that the challenge will delay certification. Earlier this week Adler told me, "Because we're doing this together [with TCAD], and not in an adversarial way, my hope and expectation is that it can be done within the existing budget calendar." (See also "This Is the Box We're In," p.22.)

Crigler was somewhat less optimistic. She said she couldn't speak for the ability of the taxing jurisdictions to adjust to an accelerated budget timeline, but she anticipates that if the challenge proceeds (the city could decide to withdraw at some point), it would delay certification from the standard mid-July at least to late August. Since Austin (for example) is generally doing final budget prep in late August (with formal approval in September), it certainly sounds like a potential rush job. As for the mayor's corollary speculation that given the actual data, TCAD would simply have to plug updated numbers into its existing valuation models and - voilá print out the answers, Crigler said: "We will try to work as cooperatively as possible, but ... commercial appraisal is extremely complex, and it's not as simple as an easy plug-and-play. ... One size doesn't fit all."

PENNIES FROM HEAVEN

I also spoke briefly with the city's consultants. Gau and Radebaugh. Alas, the city's attorneys had beat me to it, and they said they'd been advised not to comment on the pending matter just yet, in particular not to make any comments on TCAD's response to their report. And neither felt they had any basis on which to speculate how long the challenge process might take.

That's a useful reminder that once the attorneys are involved, looming is at least the possibility that matters could proceed beyond the Appraisal Review Board into litigation, and Adler told the Statesman last week that he favored legal action if necessary. That would also mean, Crigler said, that TCAD would have to certify nondisputed valuations by its existing calculations, and disputed valuations by either last year's values or this year's - whichever is lower. The local commercial real estate market did not exactly freeze in 2014. All in all, I suspect it will be some time before we see the return from commercial "undervaluations" raining down on local taxpayers like manna from heaven.

Planning Is Doing

EASTSIDE WINS. COUNCIL STRUGGLES

For all the talk this week about property tax exemptions, the planning agendas are where the action is.

It started at the **Planning Commission** Tuesday night with a couple of apparent wins for the near-Eastside neighborhoods: denials of both a proposed hotel on East Cesar Chavez (see "Eastside Hotel Denied at Planning Commission," p.16), and a Conditional Use Permit application which Springdale Farms had expected would allow them to continue to put on regular events at their property. Commission votes are only advisory, of course, and both decisions could be appealed, but it's unclear at this point whether either party has the stomach for that

Then there's City Council. This is their

week to concentrate on zoning cases, a couple of which are thorny (see "Council," p.14) but also on today's agenda is a very early look at the proposed **The Grove at** Shoal Creek Planned Unit Development, a 75.74 acre mixed-use project to be located on the former state land at Bull Creek Road and 45th Street. There's no action at this point, but neighbors are

starting to sniff around, kick the tires, and bone up on the complex mathematics of drainage, impervious cover, and traffic impact analysis. "City staff will continue their review," says the preview from city staff "and the PUD will be presented to City Council for final approval at a later date." They make it sound so simple.

The Council's Planning and Neighborhoods Committee has a brief, but heavy,

agenda for their Monday, June 15, meeting (1pm at City Hall): they'll consider amendments to City Code regarding accessory dwelling units: a resolution affirming Approach 2.5 of CodeNEXT, the massive Land Development Code rewrite: and "recommendations on short-term rental regulations and enforcement." The ADU issue would seem to be fairly simple: the Planning Commission's recommendation, adopted unanimously, would reduce building and entrance setbacks, eliminate driveway requirements, apply the ordinance citywide (overriding neighborhood plans and other restrictions), and, notably, prohibit the units' use as "Type 2" commercial short-term rentals (i.e. the ones used purely as STRs and owned by absentee landlords). But it's this

> last use regulation that has apparently most raised the hackles of the "new urban" opposition that seems to be fronting for RECA and the Board of Realtors, so expect some barking. (And on that subject, CM Sheri Gallo will hold a press conference the morning this issue comes out, to announce a resolution she's sponsoring, asking the city manager to "investigate

issues and citizen complaints related to the City's ability to properly enforce City Code as it relates to the operations of short-term rentals," and to report back to Council by Aug. 13 on whether there are "gaps within City policy that require City Council action.")

Not to be outdone, the **Zoning and Plat**ting Commission meets the next day, Tuesday, June 16 (6pm, Council Chambers), to hear the latest pitch for the Austin Oaks

PUD, a proposed massive development at Spicewood Springs and MoPac – scaled back since it was first spitballed a year ago, but still way out of line with neighborhood plans, and with the Imagine Austin plan. Expect developers' rep Steve Drenner to trot out results of a recent push poll reportedly targeted to residents in Tarrytown, Balcones, and Northwest Hills.

And, while we're at it, how's that city planning department reorg coming?

The Travis County Commissioners Court will receive a staff briefing on the implementation of the county's Land, Water & Transportation Plan (LWTP), this Thursday, June 11, 1:30pm, at the Travis County Admin. 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Committee Versus Commission

PUBLIC SAFETY CHAIRMEN ZIMMERMAN AND ROSSMO TRADE INVITATIONS

On June 1, just before hearing staff briefings at the final Public Safety Commission to be held under the current administration of appointees, Commission chairman Kim Rossmo voiced his displeasure with the City Council's Public Safety Committee, specifically its chairman, Council Member Don Zimmerman. "I wanted to let the members of the commission know that I asked for a presentation from the Austin Public Safety Committee regarding the interaction and relationship between the two bodies," he noted. "They refused."

Zimmerman actually redirected the invitation altogether, and requested that Rossmo appear at the committee's May 26 meeting to present his perspective during the brief, open citizen communication segment of the meeting, during which anybody who wants can provide an elevator pitch before the committee at a length of three minutes. Rossmo, likely on his way out the door after six years of service and nearly two years as commission chairman, considered the response somewhat insulting. "We were asking for information from them," he explained. "It made no sense for him to ask us [to go to their meeting]. It was clear that they had no interest in discussing this."

Council Member Zimmerman perceives the situation guite differently, saving that his decision to rebuff Rossmo's invitation was part of an effort to avoid having one man - in this case himself, the chairman speak on behalf of the committee's four members. From his office last Friday, Zimmerman advocated for a wait-and-see approach on coordination between the two bodies moving forward. "I have to see who's on there and see what their opinions are." he said. "The commission has its own will. It'll have its own chairman and its own agenda. I want to see what direction they want to go."



That, in essence, is exactly what Rossmo believes the committee should be trying to

Since its 2009 conversion from task force to permanent commission, the Public Safety Commission has served, to various degrees of access and priority, as the advisory body to Council on all budgetary and policy matters concerning public safety. Its seven members (soon to be 11 - the new Council members' appointees will take their seats in August) hail from various corners of public safety servitude: Rossmo's a criminal justice professor at Texas State and a retired Vancouver police officer; Sam Holt worked for nearly three decades as a commander with the Austin Police Department; Mike Levy helped form Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services in the Seventies; Rebecca Webber,



a civil rights attorney, also serves on the Office of the Police Monitor's Citizen Review Panel. They are experts on the topic of public safety, attests Rossmo, and should be consulted as such by the newly formed Public Safety Committee (whose four members - CMs Zimmerman, Greg Casar, Ora Houston, and Leslie Pool - have met only three times since their formation).

"The committee is a bunch of politicians, and they don't have expertise," he says. "It's almost philosophical: What is a commission supposed to be comprised of? We're representative, but it's clear that we have some expertise in this field. It's disappointing that the city hasn't availed itself to us at this point."

Perhaps Rossmo, in what could be his last days as commission chairman, is more willing to speak candidly than any of his colleagues. Council has thus far appointed five commissioners to the board: Rebecca Gonzales, Zimmerman's appointee Bill Worsham, and returning commissioners Levy, Webber, and Holt. Asked this week about the commission's future role within the city, Worsham, Levy, and Webber were all a bit more hesitant in their assertions.

"I think there's going to be a little bit of working out how that relationship is going to fit best for everyone, but I think it's an improvement to have a Council committee that's focused on the issues," noted Webber. "What I don't want is for us to be at loggerheads. I want to assist the committee as much as possible. And I hope that it will be collaborative. I would very much like to see the chair of the commission go to the committee and see how we can help."

According to Casar, vice chairman of the Public Safety Committee, Council's still "working out the kinks of the new committee system," with plans to hold a public meeting soon in which Council members will sort out how exactly they want the committees to interact with boards and commissions. "My intention," he said, "and I think the intention of the Council in January, is to make a clear pathway for boards and commission to send to Council committees." He envisions Council committees crafting their own agendas as they see fit, with certain items coming from commissioners' recommendations.

That, of course, can only work if the two parties are committed to working with one another, and if the commission has the ear of Zimmerman and his constituents to put their recommendations on committee agendas. Zimmerman, for now, isn't affording anyone any inside looks at expectations.

"I'd like to see that commission form," he said. "They're going to elect a chair. Let's let that happen. They'll get together and make a list [of topics to investigate]. We have a list. We'll get together and look at each other's lists. It's very likely that there will be some items that match up. But they'll match up separately. They're separate bodies." - Chase Hoffberger

COUNCIL: ZONED OUT

There are no less than 28 zoning cases on the City Council agenda today (June 11), the latest fruit of Council's policy to segregate zoning matters into their own meetings. Some of these are likely to be contentious, including Item 43, the Bluebonnet Hills Historic Landmark District case. This is in Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo's District 9, but the landmark case was already a bone of contention in an earlier meeting, concerning D6 CM Don Zimmerman's appointee to the Historic Landmark Commission - Arif Panju, who lives in Bluebonnet Hills and disagrees with the neighborhood association over the issue. So even though it arrives with positive recommendations from staff, the Planning Commission, and the Historic Landmark Commission, it may not go smoothly.

There are several other items that bear watching, including Item 23, the **Cameron Apartments** (9201 Cameron), where the **Zoning and Platting Commission** and the staff split on their recommendations. While a few cases are certain to get punted to another day, among the 28 are bound to be a few land mines, and consider the arithmetic: Even if they're cut to say, 20 cases, requiring perhaps 15 (conservative) minutes each, we're talking five hours in Council time.

But that's not all, of course. CM Zimmerman has raised questions about an ABIA terminal management lease (Item 2), so that disquisition may gobble some time. A flooded house buyout in Barrington Oaks (Item 4) that Council postponed in April returns - it's not clear whether the absence of a "citywide policy" on buyouts (quibbled at the June 4 meeting) will scupper the purchase again. There are a couple of afternoon public hearings on the agenda: a neighborhood appeal (Item 49) of a waterfront variance granted to a hotel project at Red Bluff (Mayor Steve Adler had earlier suggested a possible workaround involving moving a city road); and a couple of administrative hearings (Item 50) required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban **Development** and another by state law (expect to hear CM Zimmerman expound on the horrors of HUD).

There are also a handful of Council items that will need airtime. Item 8 would authorize payment of some of the costs associated with an April 18 Capitol rally to commemorate the Armenian genocide. MPT Tovo is sponsoring a resolution to create a city-county working group to move forward on a

"sobriety center" as an alternative to booking every public intoxication arrest - that's an initiative of the previous Council, and it's not clear yet whether this one will follow suit. As promised, D4 CM Greg Casar is sponsoring a resolution to budget funding to benefit lower-income Austinites (prompted by last week's homestead exemption for homeowners; see budget feature, p.22) - we'll see if there's money left over for that. D8 CM Ellen Troxclair and four colleagues want to defund \$3.2 million budgeted for "non-sworn" (i.e., not public safety) positions that have been "vacant" for more than 12 months (although they may have temporary occupants); she also wants to freeze at 2015 levels the taxable value of homesteads owned by seniors or people with disabilities the draft "resolution" (which should likely be an ordinance) does not mention the ability to pay or mention any cap on the value of the homestead, and some are proposing a raise in the over-65 homestead exemption as a fairer alternative.

The morning briefing is on "The Grove at Shoal Creek" PUD (the private development at 45th and Bull Creek Road, formerly state land). There are no proclamations or musical honorees, so noontime Citizen Communications will have to provide the liveliest entertainment. - Michael King

Meet the New Neighbors

Old and New Austin approached a collision course this week, as the simmering dispute over accessory dwelling units reached City Council's Planning and Neighborhoods Committee on

Tuesday, riding a wave of land-use activists pressing to expand the use of small living units in central city neighborhoods. The committee considered a resolution directing city staff to draft new regs for ADUs - the zoning-speak for living units more commonly known as garage apartments,



backyard cottages, or "granny flats" - as one way to provide additional units and increase neighborhood density. The Austin Neighborhoods Council and traditional neighborhood associations have mostly opposed easing regulations on ADUs as creating residential overcrowding and parking problems, but newer groups such AURA - which held a rally at City Hall prior to Tuesday's committee meeting - argue that the high demand for affordable housing requires innovative solutions, including citywide use of ADUs. In a press release, AURA board member Eric Goff said in part: "Austinites want to ensure middle- and lower-income residents will continue to have a place inside the community as Austin grows. AURA's recommendations on backyard cottages are the first step toward making this happen." The committee heard extensive testimony from all sides, and adjourned with the issue posted for action at its June 15 meeting – in anticipation of Council discussion and possible action at the regular June 18 meeting. - Michael King





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Is K2 Unstoppable?

SYNTHETIC POT CONFOUNDS REGULATORY EFFORTS

Bad batches of synthetic marijuana - also called K2, spice, or roughly a hundred other stylized brand names are still sending Texans to the emergency room, even after the DEA banned the original form of the drug nationwide in 2012. Marketed word-of-mouth by people looking to dodge drug tests, K2 is still being produced by large-scale manufacturers, in Texas and beyond. K2-induced side effects, which can include vomiting, high blood pressure, and even seizures and hallucinations, have caused a sudden, alarming rise in trips to Austin-area ERs. On Tuesday, June 9, Austin-Travis County EMS reported that it has received 127 K2-related calls and 147 patients since May 29.

Once the original chemical compounds were banned on the federal and state levels, entrepreneurs both overseas and homegrown began to tweak the formula - named JWH for its creator, chemist John Huffman. These later versions created vaguely the same effect, but police have been stymied in their ability to make arrests if the molecular structure of the substance varies by even a hydrogen atom from that outlawed by legislation. Marked with a "not for human consumption" disclaimer, the product can still be found for about \$10 per gram in most local head shops, and is available in bulk online.

"We're chasing our tail," admitted Austin Police Department forensic scientist Ralph Salazar in an interview with the Chronicle. "Most of the time, it's not difficult to figure out an analysis on these things. They're all closely related from a chemistry standpoint. But the problem becomes legislation."

After overseas chemists produce it in its initial powder form, K2 is shipped into Texas, where it is turned into a liquid that can be spread on tobacco or any other number of substances people would be willing to smoke. Salazar noted that early batches, before the wave of post-2011 regulation, looked and smelled so similar to marijuana that officers on the street often couldn't distinguish between the two drugs. More recent concoctions have looked more like potpourri, and tasted not much better. The obvious appeal of "spice," other than its ostensible legality, is the inability of most labs to distinguish it on a urine test. Salazar said some compounds will show up on tests, but, unlike marijuana, their half-life is so brief, the chances are slim.

These qualities have turned the drug into the South's latest cash crop.

Joan Huffman, Sen. R-Houston, shepherded SB 173 through this year's legislative session. The bill, aimed at tightening the regulation of synthetic drugs, was signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott this month and will take effect

in September. However, Salazar was quick to temper expectations. It'll be a matter of months before chemists find ways to further tweak the compound - making new laws obsolete even before the lawmakers end their vacations. Once the mutated supply enters the market, the process of identifying and documenting the changes begins again. If anything, Salazar said, the problem has gotten worse. "So we send out a lab report with our little phrase: 'No controlled substances detected," he said. "We know what it is, we know it's a cannabinoid - it's probably acting the same way in their body, but technically the compound has been altered just enough that this person hasn't done anything wrong. And so our hands are tied."

On the street, APD Detective Shane Streepy has dealt with K2's worst side effects, and struggled to trace batches that sent a handful, or in some cases dozens, of people to the hospital. "We get the call that multiple people were basically dropping down at the ARCH [Austin Resource Center for the Homeless]. When I went down to try to talk to some of these people who just got put in the hospital, these people were almost psychotic," Streepy recalled. "They weren't responding to simple questions; they're laid out in the bed and they're not with it."

Even if he could coax a response out of any user, there's still the sheer overwhelming amount of traffic at the Seventh Street shelter, which makes it virtually impossible to know how many different people handled the drug, and with what intentions.

"There are claims that this person bought some from somebody he didn't know, and the word is it was sprayed with, I heard, Raid at one point," Streepy said. "I remember issue we have with this stuff - the foil bags aren't sealed by the FDA. You don't know what was put into them."

Austin native Bryan, whose last name has been withheld, used K2 regularly before it was banned. Though in that seven- or eight-month period he mostly felt his "stomach turn," he also experienced hallucinations and extreme anxiety. "I didn't really black out," Bryan said. "The time with the lizard was kind of weird - when I thought my hand had turned into a lizard and I almost cut it off ... I woke up the next morning like, 'I almost cut my hand off. I'm never doing that again."

KXAN reported last November the owners of the Smoke Shop, a head shop on Montopolis near 183, were arrested for distributing K2, after a bad batch sent two dozen people to the ER. In April, another outbreak struck the Downtown area, this time closer to the University of Texas campus, "Because of the overdoses, we just saw people who got sick," Streepy noted. "But I've talked to other people who say they've been K2 smokers for 10 years, and they like it. Nothing happens to them. They don't understand why people get sick." - Nina Hernandez





Pepper-Spray Video Goes Viral

Police are still investigating what exactly happened Downtown Saturday night when a late-night skirmish on Sixth Street devolved into a chaotic, police-heavy scene that, according to footage posted on YouTube that night, involved one mounted officer snatching an apparent cop-filming bystander's cell phone - whereupon another officer pepper sprayed that individual. APD hasn't yet released information about the officers involved in the incident, and almost surely won't until its investigation is complete. But the video, which was posted by an online gamer in town for the X Games, has since been viewed more than 300.000 times. - Chase Hoffberger

Eastside Hotel Denied at Planning Commission

The city's **Planning Commission** voted 4-1 Tuesday, June 9, against granting a conditional use permit for a pair of would-be hoteliers who hope to build a 65-room, three-story facility in the midst of an established neighborhood.

"The decision by the Planning Commission is a quarded relief to those of us who worked so hard to fight the construction of a hotel on East Cesar Chavez, the aorta of our beloved neighborhood," a weary Alberto Martinez, chair of the East Cesar Chavez Neighborhood Planning Team, said the day after the vote. "We pounded the streets with petitions, we researched, we planned, we gave it our all. But most importantly, we came together – disparate groups that at times fight each other – in a common cause. We came together and we prevailed."


Some 40 community members gathered outside City Hall before the Planning Commission's vote, to protest the development. They waited until midnight to hear the board's decision in a packed agenda where the hotel was the 18th item to be discussed. District 3 Council Member Pio Renteria was among those voicing his disapproval of the hotel plans: "There are many things in our neighborhood that are desperately needed. This hotel is not one of these," he said, noting the increased traffic the hotel would bring on an already-congested East Cesar Chavez. Brian and Bree Carrico, a husband-and-wife team of entrepreneurs, hope to build their hotel at 1207 E. Cesar Chavez - across the street from a daycare center and church.



"It will affect the safety of our children," Renteria said. "It is not needed here in our neighborhood, and it's about time we decide we're not going to take it anymore."

It's unclear at press time whether the Carricos will take their proposal to City Council, despite the PC's negative recommendation.

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In Wake of Flooding, Hays Water Victory Bittersweet

LAST-MINUTE REVERSAL REVIVES GROUNDWATER PROTECTION BILL



Surviving attacks from outside the region, Hays County water advocates were victorious in the last hours of the legislative session: House Bill 3405, the bill that gives Barton Springs-Edwards Aquifer Conservation District the authority to regulate the currently unregulated "white zone" of the Trinity Aquifer, passed both the House and Senate. Unless Gov. Greg Abbott chooses to veto the bill, it will become law.

Advocates spent the first half of this year fighting to get the white zone regulated, and to make sure the Trinity Aquifer is protected from overpumping. They became concerned when they learned that the Houstonbased company Electro Purification planned to pump more than 5 million gallons of water a day from the aquifer to sell to cities along the I-35 corridor.

"Now the work begins," said BSEACD General Manager John Dupnik. Within 90 days after the bill becomes law, the district will need to let well owners who are operating in the newly regulated area know they need to apply for a temporary permit. The temporary permit allows them to continue operations without much scrutiny during the interim period. BSEACD will use the 90

days to scrutinize pumping volumes and hold public hearings before the BSEACD board makes the final decisions on permits. The district can limit production volume if it would result in failure to achieve a desired future condition for the aguifer, or if it would cause projected unreasonable impact on existing wells.

During the same period, the district will need to develop monitoring wells in the area, and continue the technical evaluation of the Middle Trinity in the vicinity of the EP well field. Dupnik said, "That's been a purely scientific endeavor to start collecting baseline data on the aquifer in that area such that we can compare it later to the effects of a pump test, or even further down the road, how drought conditions have an effect on things."

Author Rep. Jason Isaac, R-Dripping Springs, and Senate sponsor Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels, had to fight opposition to the bill from outside the region - Sen. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock, and Rep. Mary González, D-El Paso, who both expressed concern about the bill setting a precedent that would affect the rest of the state.

Isaac said he suspects there were people behind the scenes working against the bill as well. "I just think there are some people who were working against us who have purely financial motivations and no desire to protect our groundwater or to protect all the citizens of Hays County," he said.

The drama escalated when González raised a point of order asking whether a House rule had been violated that would kill the bill; it was later sustained. "When midnight passed, I knew it was too late to get it fixed," Isaac said. "I knew we had a one-in-a-million shot to actually get something done." He called the Hays County water advocates and told them it looked like the bill was dead, but he wasn't giving up.

The next day, a last-minute reprieve caught everyone by surprise. The parliamentarian announced a reversal of the previous night's point-of-order ruling. It then moved to a House-Senate conference committee and saw eventual approval from both chambers. Isaac said he was exhausted from the fight and shocked by the turn of events. "That announcement, when it came down, I broke down in complete shock, I mean absolute shock. I don't think anything has ever happened to me like that in my life before."

The last fight for HB 3405 came just as Havs County citizens were immersed in the aftermath of the Memorial Day flood, grieving losses and starting cleanup and relief efforts. Louie Bond, Rolling Oaks resident and water advocate, said the community celebration of the victory will be low-key. and for her, it's bittersweet. "I think it's heartening to know that the voice of the people can still be heard. But there were points in the process where it was overruled by one or two powerful people, and that concerns me about our system in general," she said. "So far it's a tough war where we've won this battle, and that helps us have a positive outlook for the rest of this war. And it is a war." - Vicki Wolf

Over Troubled Waters

While Austin and Travis County escaped the worst of this year's Memorial Day flooding - that nod goes to Wimberley and San Marcos - Travis County was indeed declared a federal disaster area (eligible for disaster loans), and Downtown, especially North Lamar along Shoal Creek, was hit pretty hard. Less noticed was flooding on the Eastside, including sections of Northeast Austin and also Montopolis, where resident Stefan Wray sent along a photo of the wrecked bridge over Country Club Creek, east of the Krieg softball fields. He's alerted city management about the wreckage, which now blocks pedestrian and bike passage from Montopolis toward Downtown: "More and more people have been using this trail to travel all the way to the Montopolis Bridge," Wray writes, "to make a long loop around the river and lake." He's hoping the city will make repairing the bridge a priority.









Council Extends Cab Contracts


City Council approved a plan last Thursday that will extend the current agreement with the pre-existing three taxicab franchises for another five years, as well as grant 50 new permits to each of the three companies, in exchange for two provisional changes: one requiring the closest cab to accept any ride assigned to it, and another requiring the three companies to update their fleets so that 10% of all cars are wheelchair accessible (previous mandates required only 6.5%). The companies – Yellow Cab, Austin Cab, and Lone Star Cab – will also have the ability to increase the size of their fleets in the future if



they meet a series of city standards for providing rides to individuals with disabilities and low-income clients of certain health care organizations. Less clear is any development on the road map for how the city plans to implement a fourth, driver-owned co-op franchise, which the **Taxi Drivers Association of Austin** has repeatedly pushed for, and which Council directed city staff to begin developing in May.

Fifth Circuit Upholds Anti-Abortion Law

ONLY EIGHT CLINICS EXPECTED TO SURVIVE RULING

Texas will be left with an estimated eight abortion clinics for the state's 5 million reproductive-age women, as a result of a ruling issued by the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals on Tuesday that forces clinics to comply with onerous and costly hospital-style building changes.

The first three sections of the fourpart abortion-restrictive law – referred to as **House Bill 2**, from the 2013 lege session - have already taken effect: a rule that requires physicians to obtain admitting privileges at a hospital within 30 miles of the clinic where

they perform the procedure; a rule that mandates patients follow outdated FDA protocol when ingesting abortion medication; and an abortion ban after 20 weeks of pregnancy. The final provision of HB 2 forces clinics to make expensive structural updates in order to meet ambulatory surgical center (ASC) standards, which include building janitor closets and expanding doorways. The changes could cost up to millions for abortion providers, many of which are modest, independent clinics unable to afford the hefty price tag. (An example given during testimony: A 7,000-square-foot building would cost in the ballpark of \$5 million.) Reproductive health clinics have argued that these requirements are wholly unnecessary and amount to a "multimillion dollar tax" on abortion providers. While an initial suit unsuccessfully challenged the hospital admitting privilege and medicine sections, the second legal battle, Whole Woman's Health v. Lakey, aims to strike down the ASC rule, and also the admitting privilege requirements for clinics in McAllen and El Paso - underserved, minority-populated areas.

In the latest ruling, judges allow HB 2's ASC rule to take effect, with an exception for McAllen (but not El Paso). The panel continually knocked plaintiff arguments and evidence, and relied heavily on state witnesses, who were coached by a widely

discredited anti-choice advocate. Admitting that women in poverty will experience heightened barriers due to HB 2, the court nevertheless finds that not enough - or at least an unclear number of - women will see an undue burden. "[W]e agree with the motions panel majority: We do not doubt that women in poverty face greater difficulties. However, to sustain a facial challenge, the Supreme Court and this circuit require Plaintiffs to establish that the law itself imposes an undue burden on at least a large fraction of women. Plaintiffs have not done so here."

Abortion providers aren't giving up the fight; they plan to take their case to the **U.S.** Supreme Court. "We will go up to the Supreme Court on an emergency basis," said Whole Woman's Health founder Amy Hagstrom Miller during a press call following the ruling. Plaintiffs will first request a stay from the 5th Circuit; if (more likely, when) the circuit court denies the stay, providers plan to go directly to SCOTUS. Why would plaintiffs choose to go straight to the high court rather than appeal to the full 5th Circuit? "They've made it very clear that they are not willing to enforce women's constitutional rights," said Stephanie Toti, plaintiff attorney with the Center for **Reproductive Rights.** "The point [of HB 2] is to make Texas an abortion-free state," she said, and if this ruling holds, in many ways,

it will be. The provision is expected to take effect on July 1.

Heather Busby of reproductive health group NARAL Pro-Choice Texas described the ruling as a "travesty." The 5th Circuit has "once again put their political ideology" above the law. "Many Texans will not be able to end their pregnancies safely because they do not have the time or resources it takes to travel long distances to abortion clinics," said Busby in a statement. "My heart breaks when I think of the hundreds of thousands of Texans whose health and safety has been compromised by this devastating decision."

The much anticipated ruling over the final part of HB 2 comes roughly five months after oral arguments before the 5th Circuit (see "HB 2 Back in Court: Judges Get Critical," Jan. 7). Uncharacteristically, a three-judge panel on the notoriously conservative 5th Circuit - all George W. Bush appointees, including two who previously upheld other parts of HB 2 - delivered a refreshingly critical line of questioning during the hearing, even casting doubt over how the ASC physical plant requirements improve women's safety. However, the criticism apparently didn't translate to a favorable conclusion for the plaintiffs.

A brief recap: U.S. Judge Lee Yeakel deemed the ASC rule unconstitutional in August, but the state quickly appealed. The 5th Circuit then upheld the law, sending the rule into effect in October. Some 13 clinics closed their doors and sent patients and providers into a panic and a "logistical nightmare." Plaintiffs then appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, which temporarily halted the law on Oct. 14.

As a result of HB 2, the number of abortion clinics in Texas has already been cut by more than half, from 41 to 17. The rule is estimated to leave abortion care up to 500 miles away for women who live west or south of San Antonio. An estimated 1 million women will now need to travel more than 150 miles (one way) for care, with lowincome and rural women, those with the fewest resources, feeling the deepest impact. In Austin, only one abortion center, Planned Parenthood South, is guaranteed to remain open. - Maru Tuma



People's Veto

Braving Texas' summer heat, 20-year-old Sadie Hernandez plans to stand outside the Governor's Mansion nearly every day in protest of the state budget plan to exclude Planned Parenthood from a lifesaying breast- and cervical cancer screening program. The budget is slated to arrive on Gov. Greg Abbott's desk for signature this month. Under the new plan – explicitly meant to hurt the abortion care network – only providers eligible for the Texas Women's Health Program can be part of Breast and Cervical Cancer Services (BCCS), an assurance that Planned Parenthood is not involved, as GOP officials booted the provider out three years ago for the same ideologically driven reasons.

Originally from Brownsville, Hernandez said the cuts "hit close to home."

"As a Mexican-American woman. I know that cervical cancer affects women of color, Hispanic, Latino, and lowincome women the most - it's among the number one killers," she said. "So the people that will be hit hardest are the people that need it the most." Indeed, African-American and Latina women have higher rates of cervical cancer than other groups, and women residing along the Texas-Mexico border are 31% more likely to die from cervical cancer than women living in non-border communities.

Hernandez and reproductive rights activists who filter in and out to join her protest - including the program's cancer survivors who have driven hundreds of miles – are calling on Abbott to veto the budget measure. They plan to present the governor with a 15,000-signature petition requesting the same. However, that outcome is a long shot for the vehemently anti-choice governor. At the least, advocates hope to bring heightened awareness to the issue so that, in the end, lawmakers' actions don't go unpunished. - Mary Tuma

NINTH EXECUTION SLATED FOR JUNE 18

On Thursday, June 18, the state of Texas plans to execute Gregory Russeau, a 45-year-old Tyler man, convicted in Oct. 2002 of killing 75-year-old James Syvertson in his auto shop's garage on May 30, 2001.

Russeau was found guilty of capital murder after jurors deliberated for less than an hour. He argued, after his conviction, that he was found guilty because his attorney Clifton Roberson fumbled his handling of witnesses and failed to argue that law enforcement planted evidence (two hairs belonging to Russeau found on a bottle) at the crime scene.

Those concerns were raised in subsequent petitions for writ of habeas corpus filed by Jeffrey Haas.

Haas, it should be said, had his own issues. As a petition for relief filed in 2012 by Carlo D'Angelo notes:

"Both the 2004 and 2009 petitions for habeas corpus that Mr. Haas filed in the state district court contained no claims that were based upon any evidence or the result of any investigation that occurred outside of the Clerk's Record and trial transcript in either of the Petitioner's cases, thus indicating that Mr. Haas did virtually nothing to investigate the facts pertaining to the actions of trial and appellate counsel, potential mitigation, and potential prosecutorial misconduct and withholding of evidence."

The trial court held an evidentiary hearing on Dec. 2, 2004, during which Roberson

and his co-counsel Brandon Baade testified to the competence of their representation of Russeau. Six months later, in June 2005, the Texas Court of Criminal

Appeals issued an opinion that upheld Russeau's conviction but remanded the case back to trial for a new sentencing. There, he was represented – once again – by Roberson and Baade, the two attorneys who failed to properly represent him in the first place, and whom Russeau specifically asked the court to not appoint for the second hearing (on the grounds that Roberson

and Baade had waived the attorney-client privilege when they testified at the hearing.)

Russeau's second punishment-determination hearing was held in 2007 and resulted in the same findings and sentence as his first. (Unsurprisingly, his

argument hinged on the claim that Roberson and Baade did a bad job representing their client.) He was denied a 2009 petition for relief, filed by Haas, in 2010, at which point D'Angelo assumed Russeau's counsel. A Feb. 2012 federal petition was denied, as was an appeal to the U.S. Court of Appeals in March 2014. Appeals for relief from the **U.S. Supreme Court** were denied in October.

Russeau will be the ninth Texan executed this year, and the 527th since the state reinstated the death penalty in 1976.

Back in 2008, Democratic Sen. Dianne Feinstein declared: "There are parts of government that can be run like a business and should be run like businesses."

Thus, the chairwoman of the Senate com-

mittee overseeing Congressional facilities privatized the restaurants and other food services in the U.S. Senate. Sure enough, those dining spots now turn a profit, because they are being "run like businesses" - specifically a business like McDonald's. Restaurant Associates, the New York outfit that got the House and Senate food contract, profits by paying poverty-level wages and generally mistreating the cooks, waitstaff, and other people who put

Wages are less than \$11 an hour, well below the very expensive cost of living in the Washington, D.C., area, "Everybody has second jobs," says one weary worker. And when our \$174,000-a-year members of Congress adjourn for the three months or so of vaca-

the "service" in food service.


tion they take each year, the food service workers are sent away with no pay at all. In fairness, I should note that Restaurant Associates did give a pay raise to some workers not long ago - it was 3¢ an hour. That's not a raise; it's an insult!

"I serve food to some of the most powerful people on Earth," says a Senate cook. "They often talk of expanded opportunity for workers, but most don't seem to notice or care that workers in their own building are struggling to survive."

Care? A key Republican committee chairman, Rep. Tom Graves, recently showed how much Congress cares about inequality by refusing even to consider requiring food service contractors to pay a living wage: "It's really not within the scope of this committee to micromanage all contracts," he sniffed.

Think of how that makes the Capitol dining staff feel. If I was ol' Tom, from now on I wouldn't eat anywhere in the Capitol without taking a food taster with me.

This Is the Box We're In

City Council attempts to cut the city budget - before there is one

It may be a while before the city of Austin has a budget.

That was the message delivered by Deputy Chief Financial Officer Ed Van Eenoo in a recent Council work session, as he sketched out for Mayor Steve Adler and Council members the potential consequences of the challenge petition they were contemplating filing against the commercial property evaluations of the Travis Central Appraisal District. Austin may have a reasonable case - a consultant's report commissioned by the previous Council recently declared that, for various reasons, commercial properties may be undervalued by as much as 47% (see "Point Austin: The Appraisal Scam," May 22) – but the problem is one of timing.

Even should the challenge succeed, and the Appraisal Review Board conclude that the city is right and the appraisals need adjustment in favor of residential homeowners, it's possible the city won't learn that for several months, after the August-September cycle for adopting the budget. Property taxes represent roughly 42% of the city's total income, so the absence of precise figures is a difficult hole to fill. Budget writers would either have to draft the budget and set a tax rate while not knowing the city's potential property tax income - based on total property values not yet certified by TCAD - or else hang fire on the whole operation, pending resolution of the challenge.

Neither option is comforting, and even less reassuring would be Council actually voting to adopt a speculative budget with their collective fingers crossed. (TCAD Chief Appraiser Marya Crigler said that the challenge would move the certification from the end of July to at least mid-November, moving the city's tax deadline from Jan. 1 to March 1.) Yet that's the prospect contemplated in the city's TCAD challenge, which was approved in principle by Council May 28, although with the possibility of withdrawing the challenge after Council consults with its potential partners and completes due diligence on its evaluation research.

However, earlier this week Adler told the Chronicle that since the challenge "is not being done in an adversarial way" - and in fact TCAD has responded favorably to the possibility of more complete information and he expects "that the appeal can be prosecuted in a way that does not delay the certification of the tax roll." He also said he is not overly alarmed by TCAD's initial, very skeptical response to the city's consultant report. "They're reacting to a report without any data," Adler said. "We're going to get that data to the chief appraiser, so she can put it in her own models, and help her decide if any modifications need to be made." The accelerated timeline might mean a certification based on existing val-



ues, but despite the mayor's optimism, it remains unclear how the properties can be re-evaluated without at least some delay to the TCAD certification.

Meanwhile, about those potential partners: Roughly 100 Travis County jurisdictions, most of them much smaller than Austin, also depend on TCAD's certified property valuations to set their tax rates and draft their budgets. Several of those e.g., the cities of Round Rock, Cedar Park, and Leander, Austin Community College, Central Health Care District, etc. - reacted very nervously to the city's challenge.

The homestead exemption has effectively become the reflexive, official euphemism for "affordability" when - at whatever size or extent it will have little substantive effect on Austinites' actual living expenses or quality of life.

Unlike Austin, which has sizable reserve funds, the smaller taxing units tend to rely heavily on their annual property tax income to pay basic expenses - and while they are sympathetic to Austin's position, they don't want to be telling employees or creditors that the check is in the mail.

The city's two largest potential allies in this effort have diverged in their responses. The Austin Independent School District administration appears willing to back the city's effort, and Chief of Staff Mel Waxler told the group of officials meeting at City Hall May 27 that he believes that "a community solution" - either the direct challenge or some related joint maneuver - has a good chance of success. But a few days later - the Tuesday after Council had voted to file the challenge -Travis County Commissioners Court declined to concur. The Court voted instead, 3-2, to take no action, the dissenters being Judge Sarah Eckhardt and Pct. 2 Commissioner Brigid Shea. Commissioners Ron Davis (Pct. 1) and Margaret Gómez (Pct. 4) effectively washed their hands of the matter, repeating their previous insistence that the city should simply match the county's 20% property tax homestead exemption. Afterward, Shea commented, "The Council's bold action to seek justice for residents stands in contrast to the county's lack of action."

EDUCATED GUESSWORK

Because of official state deadlines, all of this activity is taking place before the city budget review begins in earnest, and a couple of months before the almost entirely rookie Council members begin to confront the spending decisions they will have to make for FY 2016. It's difficult enough to shape a budget when you have reliable estimates of your income; when those numbers are speculative, it's essentially impossible.

Yet that's also where things stood, until last week, with Council's other pressing budget question: whether, how, and how much to allow for a property tax homestead exemption. That process is also nearing a deadline, officially June 30 if the exemption is to take effect in FY 2016. However, in practice Council needed to make a decision immediately, because staff had requested sufficient lead time to enable budget preparation to proceed with at least a rough estimate of the size of any exemption.

That happened last Thursday, June 4, after weeks of discussions, as Council settled on a 6% homestead exemption, describing it as a first phase of an eventual 20%. It was a bumpy landing: An alternative proposal, as first laid out by Adler and D4 CM Greg Casar in the June 3 work session, included a 5% exemption and the equivalent of another 1% (about \$700,000) to be dedicated "to programs that directly assist renters in our community." This hybrid version was expressly designed to respond to arguments that a percentage homestead exemption only benefits homeowners, and in direct proportion to the values of their homes. That outcome was also reflected in the district distribution of the exemption, which although quite minimal in per-household impact - heavily favors wealthier western

THE SIX PERCENT **BOUNTY**

Estimated "Property Tax Relief" by City Council District Under 6% **Homestead Exemption**

On June 4. City Council voted 7-4 to approve a 6% property tax homestead exemption for FY 2016. The exact value of the exemption will depend on the overall property values prepared by the Travis Central Appraisal District (still to be certified) and whatever property tax rate is set by Council in September. However, in mid-May, city budget officers presented to Council a district distribution estimate, with a potential "revenue neutral" rate of 48.24 cents per \$100 valuation (the original forecast rate was 47.50), and a citywide median home value of \$227,272. Median values as well as total homestead property values vary widely by district. Using those estimates, budget analysts calculated the following values of the exemption by district. and for median value homes within each district.


Note: The tax savings realized for the "median value homeowner" in each district depends on the median value of homes in that district. In District 5, for example, it's estimated at \$201,592, and the 6% exemption yields an estimated annual savings of \$21. In District 6, the total exempted homestead value is the same as District 5 (\$0.6 million), but the median homestead value is higher (\$277.476). yielding an annual tax savings of \$37.

districts at the disadvantage of poorer, eastern ones, including Casar's (see chart above).

Laying out the new proposal to his colleagues, Adler spoke at length about the city's "affordability crisis" and the necessity to "use every tool available" to address the situation (he would repeat much of that commentary near midnight Thursday, in support of a straight 6% exemption). He said his work with Casar was an attempt to avoid "pitting one sector of the city against another," and insisted it was "not really a compromise at all - it's a statement of intent that

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

one tool will not serve everybody." He and Casar sketched out their various objectives - initially targeting as a vehicle the city's Tenant-Based Rental Assistance Program and their informal proposal mentioned several other initiatives (or "tools") that have been part of the public discussion since last fall's campaign: restructuring the drainage fee, the TCAD challenge, enabling homestead preservation districts (a sore tooth in city plans for some time), "increasing the supply of housing" (its own Sisyphean project), fixing the permitting process and land development code, and preserving existing affordable housing stock.

None of these efforts are entirely new, and all of them have their own costs and their own timelines. As the work session discussion grew more intense last week - a couple of Council members argued that 5 or 6% is much too small, and most wanted to see this first step as aspirational to a 20% exemption - D5 CM Ann Kitchen asked the mayor (for purposes of public understanding) to explain why Council found itself addressing a homestead exemption (and its potential cost to the overall city budget) long in advance of having any actual FY 2016 budget numbers. Under a comfortable circumstance, went the discussion, it would seem more rational to have the exemption conversation as part of the actual July-August budget discussions.

"That's the box in which we find ourselves," replied the mayor. State law, he explained, includes specific deadlines for local tax exemptions. "We have to do it this month [June 2015] if we want it to be effective for next year," he continued. "We couldn't implement it until 2017, if we waited until after the budget process."

There you have it - or we have it - an aspirational homestead property tax exemption of 6%, attached (in intention) to dedicated expenditures to benefit needy renters (the latter to be confirmed at the June 11 Council meeting), and a pending challenge petition to TCAD that might – or might not - succeed in shifting more of the property tax burden from residential homeowners to commercial property owners. Keep your fingers crossed.

THE POLITICS OF TAXES

Adler's "box" referred to the official deadlines dictating the timelines on both the upcoming challenge petition and the filing of the homestead exemption; in both instances, Council is working somewhat in the dark concerning the precise effects of any action they decide to take (or to defer), and they would be in a much stronger position if they had more precise budget numbers at the outset. But the "box" is also a political one, to an extent of the Council members' own making. The mayor and several of the 10-1 candidates campaigned last year both on "affordability" - writ large and on the promise of a 20% homestead exemption - immediate if possible, phasedin if necessary. Having looked at staff's earlier budget forecast as well as the report on potential cuts Council requested from city staff ("Diminishing Returns," below), most (not all) appear ready to acknowledge that budget-balancing doesn't happen in a

day, and are trying to come up with a plan that takes a step in that direction without as they said again and again last week -"cutting basic services."

That's not to say they're all in agreement on how to proceed. D2 CM Delia Garza has been the strongest in flatly opposing the homestead exemption, calling it both inadequate and inequitable. Although still on maternity leave from Council attendance last week, she fired a salvo across the dais from the Statesman's op-ed page, describing the proposed 6% exemption - to be paid for by raising the tax rate - as "the wrong tool" for addressing affordability. Noting that the (estimated) \$5.2 million total to be realized by the exemption would be divided unequally across the city from East to West, yet actually without substantial benefit for any homeowner, she decried the inevitable corollary cost in city services. "It's impossible to reconcile the need for better services while also supporting a homestead exemp-

tion," Garza wrote. "Dedicating \$5.2 million to a 6 percent homestead exemption will prohibit the Council from funding any additional services outside of the city manager's proposed budget."

Making a quiet but dramatic return to the dais Thursday night, Garza firmly reiterated her objections to any exemption decision in advance of budget preparation. "How can we know whether we can afford it when we don't know what our expenses will be?" she asked. She objected to the disparate economic effects of the exemption, with the benefits proportional to the value of homes, and also opposed paying for any exemption by cutting city employee wages: "[Supporters] say stagnant wages are hurting affordability - but you want to cut wages," she said, referring to proposals by the conservative members to sharply reduce the proposed 3% wage increase for civilian city employees.

Beyond Garza, most of the other Council members were willing or eager to pursue some level of exemption. Adler campaigned on a "phase-in" of 20%, has stoutly objected to the notion that it is inequitable or regressive, and has instead looked for ways ("additional tools") that "take a multi-view approach" to affordability. D4 CM Casar joined the mayor in coming up with the hybrid version that would benefit homeowners slightly less, in the short term, while offering additional support to the most vulnerable renters. Ann Kitchen (D5) and Leslie Pool (D7) also supported the exemption - Kitchen was adamant that the Council "does not have to choose" between cutting taxes and cutting services, and Pool made a point of noting that she expects to hold parks harmless in the coming budget debate. Ora Houston (D1) tentatively supported an exemption, but when push came to shove Thursday night, said she couldn't see how it would help the elderly and disabled on fixed incomes, and finally voted no - along with Garza, Casar, and Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo (D9).

As the most experienced Council member, Tovo declined to accept at the outset that an exemption would inevitably mean increasing the tax rate; like Pool, she pointed to the possibility of ending economic incentives in business recruitment as one

DIMINISHING RETURNS: BUDGET CUTS UNDER FUTURE CONSIDERATION

The city budget staff does not present a proposed budget to City Council for its consideration until late July, but because of legislative timelines, Council has adopted a homestead exemption of 6%, which the budget staff anticipates will cost from \$5 million to \$7 million. Mayor Steve Adler has proposed paying for this by raising the property tax rate in proportion to the foregone revenue. However, Council has also considered potential budget cuts, both for the originally contemplated 20% annual exemption, and this more modest, "phased-in" exemption. Moreover, not all Council members support raising the property tax rate, and some have suggested cuts or savings to allow property tax relief.

In May, staff delivered to Council a report - "Potential Service Reductions and Revenue Enhancements" - identifying \$23 million in potential department cuts or income enhancements that would help enable a homestead exemption without, as much as possible, cutting "core services." The exemption (as enacted) would not require that level of budget adjustments, but many of these items will become part of the late summer budget discussions. In his May 12 cover memo to Council, City Manager Marc Ott pointed out that because of the size of public safety budgets (70% of the General Fund), the largest available cuts are to those departments.

A few highlights and notes:

Austin Police Department: \$8.7 million APD listed 93 positions ("full-time equivalents") for potential elimination: District representatives (44 positions);

Office of Community Liaison (11); **Highway Enforcement (38)**

Austin Fire Department: \$2.8 million

Overtime and service reductions, leaving vacancies unfilled, reducing wildfire fuel mitigation, and eliminating five civilian-support positions

Communications and Technology Management: \$1.7 million Eliminating one FTE as well as

contractors and overtime

Parks & Recreation: \$1.6 million

Ending Trail of Lights storage, eliminating 13 Ranger positions, eliminating event fee waivers, and raising prices at Barton Springs and Deep Eddy

Emergency Medical Services: \$1.5

million Eliminating 13 positions in support roles, including three sworn positions, training staff, civilian CPR training, warehouse, etc.

Fleet Services: \$1.3 million Fuel cost reductions (dependent on stable prices)

Other departments: \$5.4 million Miscellaneous

Alternatively (or in addition) to these staff-proposed reductions, certain Council members have indicated they might propose other reductions: eliminating economic incentive programs, eliminating "vacancies" (positions budgeted but unfilled), reducing proposed wage increases for city employees, reducing the library budget, and/ or eliminating city management positions. All of these choices will become part of the July/August budget discussions.

source of potential funding. (That's a popular target, although a difficult financial case - existing incentive deals are under multiyear contracts, performance-based, and are supposed to be cash-positive for the city. The potential impact of ending good-faith, contractual incentive deals with major employers like Samsung or Apple is not entirely clear, although all such deals are formally subject "to future appropriations.")

It was left to D3's Pio Renteria - who initially welcomed the Adler/Casar proposal to point out the obvious. "The real problem is the lack of housing," he said. "We [the city] have been lowering the tax rate [in response to rising property values]. If we had enough housing out there, you wouldn't see this drastic increase." While supporting the notion of rental assistance, Renteria eventually voted for the straight 6% option.

In addition to the direct assistance to renters suggested in the new proposal


(which will have to be voted on separately), Adler's posted explication does contemplate various ways to increase the supply of housing – permitting and land code reform, preserving housing stock, incentivizing affordable housing - but all are mid- to long-term solutions far beyond the next fiscal year.

Adler and several other CMs grew defensive when the conversation turned to a choice between "tax cuts" and "service cuts," or "service cuts" and "tax rate increases." Kitchen blamed "the media" for creating these misleading dilemmas, and insisted no such choices would be necessary. Yet it had been her dais colleague Garza, in her op-ed, who had juxtaposed Council's upcoming budget decisions most sharply: "In order to maintain city services at their current level while also providing a 6 percent homestead exemption, the council will

have to raise the tax rate to the highest level allowed under state law. Alternatively, we have the option to cut city services."

Those looming alternatives are much less troubling to the more conservative regions of the dais – Don Zimmerman (D6), Ellen Troxclair (D8), and Sheri Gallo (D10). Gallo has thus far tried to stand roughly in the center-right in the ongoing debate, willing to go along with the mayor's phased-in exemption but – citing her campaign promises – insisting upon language that would eventually target 20%. (Council can't bind future decisions, even its own, but in approving the 6% Council declared its "intentions" of annual increases to reach 20%.)

Zimmerman, by contrast, had posted a stern message-board response to the mayor, saying the city had already done quite enough to help renters - specifically through federally subsidized affordable housing that he strongly opposes as both wrong in principle and "unsustainable." He repeated that argument at the work session, and told his colleagues that they faced a "fundamental question": "We're either going to continue to expand the size of the city budget ... explosively ... in dramatic fashion, or not.... We need to cut spending or we don't." The apocalyptic rhetoric didn't end there; Zimmerman cited the fate of Detroit as the result of excessive government spending. "I want Austin to realize," he warned his colleagues, "that economic realities affect Austin just like they affect Detroit." (For some reason, he didn't mention the collapse of Detroit's auto industry.) Just prior to Thursday's vote, he concluded: "The city spends too much money, period."

Not quite as melodramatically – although she did conjure the image of homeowners in her Southwest district standing in food bank lines, presumably because of exorbitant city property taxes – Troxclair insisted that not only is a 20% exemption necessary,

it's readily affordable with the dedication of new revenue and major cuts to city expenses. Within her 20% proposal - rejected by her colleagues 8-3 on Thursday – she claims to have found \$60 million in cuts and additional revenues to readily pay for the estimated \$32 to \$36 million a full exemption would cost - without cutting any services. That \$60 million, it's fair to say, is quite wobbly: Troxclair would dedicate all new estimated sales tax and property tax revenues (\$25 million) to the exemption; eliminate all current city job vacancies (\$8.6 million); cancel all 380 incentive agreements; and adopt a much smaller "tiered" wage increase for city employees instead of the currently proposed 3%. The latter move would, a couple of Council members pointed out, immediately make Austin *less* affordable for thousands of city employees (sparing, presumably, only public safety employees under contract). And Tovo noted that the 126 job vacancies Troxclair wants to defund include many new firefighter cadets awaiting hiring under the finally approved Austin Firefighters Association contract – ergo, no free money.

Like statistics, budget cuts are readily subject to rhetorical abuse. Troxclair's proposal repeats the tax-cutters' canard that the 20% exemption represents a trivial, less-than-1% of the entire budget – making that claim only by smuggling in all the enterprise, income-generating departments. In fact, the 20% exemption would represent at least 4% of all General Fund expenses, the

equivalent of the entire library budget – which Zimmerman has repeatedly made clear he would like to eliminate altogether. Gallo, while initially speaking from some middle ground between the slice and whole loaf, followed Troxclair's Thursday presentation by declaring, "I agree with everything Ellen said."


Overall, first on the campaign trail and now on the dais, the exemption has effectively become the reflexive, official euphemism for "affordability" when - at whatever size or extent - it will have little substantive effect on Austinites' actual living expenses or quality of life. As CM Renteria reminded his colleagues, the core of the problem is explosive population growth and consequent rising housing prices, values, and valuations. City taxes, currently, are about 20% of the overall property tax bill; to the extent that property taxes are a substantial burden, it's due to the more than 50% represented by the school district. The Texas Legislature - also prioritizing tax cuts over public needs - just declined yet another opportunity to address that huge unfunded mandate, choosing instead to compound the problem for another biennium.

More broadly, the essentially conservative political focus on taxes as the primary source of Austin's affordability "crisis" - if that's what it is, in the most prosperous regional economy in the country - inevitably makes every expenditure appear unnecessary, every community need too expensive. Among all 11 Council members on the dais, there was not a single full-throated defense of taxation as public investment pooling our respective portions of the common responsibility for undeniable community needs. Yet if we don't invest in the community, our neighbors, and our infrastructure in good times, how will we manage it in bad?

If you happen to be one of the luckier homeowners, you might ponder that question as you deposit your couple hundred bucks of "exempted" windfall in the bank.

Walter Merrick, 66, was charged with aggravated assault in the New Orleans suburb of Harvey, La., in March after an altercation with neighbor Clarence Sturdivant, 64, over the comparative merits of Busch and Budweiser beers. Bud-man Sturdivant fired the only shot, but a sheriff's deputy said Merrick was the aggressor - since he had offered Sturdivant only a Busch. (In Tulsa, Okla., in April, police found two bloodsplattered men in an apartment parking lot at 1am, the result of a dual stabbing spree with broken beer bottles - over whether Android phones are superior to iPhones.)

Least Competent Criminals

Short-Attention-Span Thieves: 1) Alvaro Ortega, 34, was arrested for taking a uniformed police officer's cell phone in the East Coast Catering deli in Bayonne, N.J., on May 18. The sleuthing was easy, in that Ortega was the only other person in the deli at the time and sheepishly admitted the theft. 2) Seattle's KIRO-TV reported in May that a Seattle couple holding a Powerball ticket worth \$1 million still has it, despite being theft victims. Someone smashed open a window in their car on May 14 and stole, among other items, a pair of sunglasses that was resting atop the lottery ticket, but left it undisturbed.

Pointless

Holly Solomon, 31, pleaded guilty in April to aggravated assault with her Jeep - against her then-husband - and has been sentenced to three-and-a-half years in prison. The crime occurred in a suburb of Phoenix in November 2012, days after President Obama's re-election, as Solomon ran down her spouse because she was angry that he had neglected to vote for Mitt Romney as expected. However, his no-show did not affect the outcome, as Romney easily won the state's 11 electoral votes without him.

Footnotes: 1) Rusty Sills, 56, previously an "underwear bandit" in West Des Moines, Iowa, was arrested in Pinellas Park, Fla., in March, and charged with stealing women's shoes sometimes "replacing" them with shoes he no longer fancied. (Police found about 100 pairs in his van.) 2) James Dowdy, 43, on parole for an earlier sock theft, was arrested once again in Belleville, III., after police received reports of socks missing in burglaries. Authorities said Dowdy had been involved in "other types of sock-related incidents [and] using socks in an inappropriate and obscene manner," but details were not reported. (Found in a search of Dowdy's home were notebooks of children's names, ages, and types of socks worn.)

Is This a Great Country or What?

Faced with a government fee accepted by most real estate investors who view it as a routine cost of doing business, wealthy Arizona investor Wayne Howard balked. Instead of the ordinary filing-fee rate of \$50 for registering a property deed, he demanded that all 2,922 of his deeds be recorded for \$500, and when the Pinal County treasurer turned him down, he told the official he would simply use his pull in the legislature to change the law and get his 99.6% discount that way. (He almost succeeded. The bill passed the state Senate and was favored in the House, but after the Arizona Republic newspaper exposed Howard's imperial move, it failed, 30-28.)

A "News of the Weird" Classic (March 2011)

Tombstone, Ariz., which was the site of the legendary 1881 Gunfight at the O.K. Corral (commemorated in a 1957 movie), is about 70 miles from the Tucson shopping center where U.S. Rep. Gabrielle Giffords and others were shot in January (2011). A Los Angeles Times dispatch later that month noted that the "Wild West" of 1881 Tombstone had far stricter gun control than 2011 Arizona. The historic gunfight occurred when the marshal (Virgil Earp, brother of Wyatt) tried to enforce the town's no-carry law against local thugs. Today, however, with few restrictions and no licenses required, virtually any Arizonan 18 or older can carry a handgun openly.



Summer's Easy Readin'

WRITERS ON THEIR GO-TO BOOKS FOR WHEN THEIR GRAY CELLS NEED A VACAY, TOO by Robert Faires

Now is not the time for serious literature.

That's no knock against books of creative ambition, artfully crafted to engage the mind. In the right season, they're stimulating, edifying, they make life better. But once summer turns sadistic, with our pitiless CenTex sun making you feel like a Denny's Grand Slam forgotten under the heat lamp, well, then it's time to break away from the brainy in favor of something less intellectually demanding. We don't mean trash fiction necessarily (though we won't say no to that), just the kind of book that's satisfying when you want to disengage the brain and slip 'n' slide through a tale like it's a tube chute at Schlitterbahn.

For instance, when I need to mainline a bit of old-school adventure, I turn to an author who's been reliable on that score since high school: Edgar Rice Burroughs. Whether it's swashbuckling across the Red Planet with 8-foot-tall, four-armed warriors or exploring lost civilizations deep in Africa with loincloth-clad jungle lords, ERB's weird worlds, runaway-train pacing fueled by chapterclosing cliffhangers, and heroics always restore me. (Personal fave: The Return of Tarzan.)

More recently, my go-to series for mystery and laughs has become **Thursday Next** by Jasper Fforde. Though its alternate universe is intricate and is stuffed with enough timetravel paradoxes to give Stephen Hawking a migraine, the sheer inventiveness of Fforde's lit-obsessed society (where fictional characters actually police literature) and witty wordplay always make them a joy. (Definitely start with the first book: The Eyre Affair.)

We turned to several other writers to see what books they rely on for a literary vacay.

REBECCA BEEGLE, CO-FOUNDER, THE GROWNUP LADY STORY COMPANY

Joy in the Morning by P.G. Wodehouse is meticulously plotted yet reads like a fizzy treat, every sentence a delight. I have an Overlook Press edition that is lovely to look at and fun to hold. I keep it near and read it often, and it works for me every time.

ADRIENNE DAWES, PLAYWRIGHT, AM I WHITE?

When my brain's on summer break, I like celebrity memoirs, "celebrity" memoirs, and witchy teen novels from the Nineties.

Recent celebrity memoirs: Tina Fey's Bossypants, Mindy Kaling's Is Everyone Hanging Out Without Me?, Amy Poehler's Yes Please, Patti Smith's Just Kids, Kim Gordon's Girl in a Band.

As Greg Sestero tells it in The Disaster Artist, he might've been a really famous actor. But he was in The Room, a cult film that's literally so bad it's good. Get the inside scoop on the makings of a uniquely terrible cinematic masterpiece from a "celebrity" you can trust, like a best friend.

Everyone should read the entire Francesca Lia Block catalog for fun, but for a quick escape into a punky fairy-tale version of Los Angeles, visit Weetzie Bat, Witch Baby, and Missing Angel Juan.

My Cycle and the Denim Doves, co-written by Adrienne Dawes and Cyndi Williams, will premiere at Salvage Vanguard Theater in 2016.

MARSHALL RYAN MARESCA AUTHOR. A MURDER OF MAGES

One of my favorite series for escapist reading is Amanda Downum's Necromancer **Chronicles** (The Drowning City, The Bone Palace, and The Kingdoms of Dust). Downum crafts dynamic, engaging tales that turn fantasy tropes on their ear, the kind of books that you tear through, eagerly grabbing the next one as soon as you finish.

Otto Preminger's film was initially a critical and commercial flop, but it's held up well – a classic Hollywood melodrama smooth-moving between icky Electra complex and French Riviera travel porn. – Kimberley Jones




MAD'S GREATEST WRITERS: FRANK JACOBS

Running Press, 272 pp., \$30 Cheap!

A comic book before it became a magazine in 1952, MAD rode eyebrows and earlobes over the competition - action, horror, caped - by rocketing over the heads of 10-yearolds everywhere like quantum physics. If Frank Jacobs' five decades with the satirical rag made him to parody what Stanley Donen was to Hollywood musicals, then that's exactly the problem. What fifth-grader (besides yours, okay, okay) knows Seven Brides for Seven Brothers? In fact, Jacobs rewriting Irving Berlin (who?) in the Mitch Miller (who?) parody "Sing Along With MAD" got the funny guys sued to the tune of millions in a case that went all the way to the New York

State Court of Appeals. Did it force us pintsized reprobates to become more culturally and even politically astute? You betcha, and we're still smarting decades later. Like, for instance, "On a Clear Day You Can See a Funny Girl Sing 'Hello Dolly' Forever" lampoons Barbra Streisand movies (gross), while "Antenna on the Roof" schticks up Zero Mostel (who?) fiddling topside. Snort, cough, hack, sputter. (Mort Drucker the illustrator: genius.) "The Force and I - The 'Star Wars' Musical," that's more like it, except what are these directions for the singing panels? "Sung to the tune of 'My Way,'" "Sung to the tune of 'Maria.'" What, who? The "East Side Story" film send-up stars (Nikita) Khrushchev, (Jawaharlal) Nehru, and (Gamal Abdel) Nasser. Go ahead, Google away - we had to, too. Instead, keep those IQs in check by flipping to "Alfred's Poor Almanac." ("Marco Polo fleeced in Khan game, 1281.") As late as 1996, Jacobs is still at it, his cover story "Meet the Clinstones" riding Hanna-Barbera yuks from the Stone Age. ("From the town of Lil' Rock, and the one in charge is Hil-la-ry.") "Babar's Final Adventure"? An environmental spanking, while "Obituaries for Comic Strip Characters" just plain crosses the line: "[Charlie] Brown, 14, fell on his head while attempting to kick a football." Jacobs, you and your self-described "usual gang of idiots" at MAD can still lead a jackass to water, but by God, you can't make - Raoul Hernandez



AT THE WATER'S EDGE

by Sara Gruen Spiegel & Grau, 368 pp., \$28

Once upon a time, three trustfund brats - a married couple and their beloved third wheel - got wasted at a 1944 New Year's Eve bash

among Philadelphia's high-society swells. This period romance novel by Sara Gruen, bestselling author of Water for Elephants, lands somewhere between Beauty and the Beast and Fried Green Tomatoes. The lamps don't sing, but there's a monster (or three) and a chance for major transformations and deadly stew. Brimming with victory curls and air raids, rich people problems and a feet-sweepin' love story, Gruen's thematic elements might not run as deep as Nessie's black loch, but make no mistake: I devoured this novel in one night.

Ellis, colorblind, and Hank, flat-footed, are unable to serve their country in the raging Second World War; Ellis' wife Maddie, dripping in diamonds and Champagne, must maintain her impeccably beautiful image of happy social butterfly despite the recent diagnosis of

NICK OFFERMAN BookPeople, June 3

At 6:15pm, 45 minutes before Nick Offerman was scheduled to appear as part of his tour in support of Gumption, the second level of BookPeople was already near standing-roomonly. By the time 7 o'clock rolled around, there were people standing in the BookKids reading theatre trying to catch a glimpse of the beloved Parks and Rec star during the reading.

At the onset of his talk, Offerman thanked the audience for coming out. "Please keep coming to this bookstore to see authors who weren't on TV, because they write better books." Not unlike his Ron Swanson persona, Offerman was relaxed, confident, and firm in his beliefs. In fact, very little separates the two, the exceptional bristle-brush mustache notwithstanding.


In fact, Offerman was clean-shaven at this appearance and took steps to head off the facial-hair inquisition. "Before you have the chance to upset me with your questions, I had a mustache because I am a character actor who was playing a character who had a mustache. When that job ended, I had to take


off the mustache so that I could get other jobs. That is why I have done you the disservice of appearing before you with only my face."

From there he read several segments from Gumption, including a slightly risqué portion of the Benjamin Franklin chapter with a reference to dildos. "Don't worry about that," he said to some youngsters seated nearby. "That's for the ride home."

Explaining that writing this book gave him the opportunity to meet some of his heroes, including Wendell Berry. George Saunders, and Conan O'Brien, Offerman shared a hilarious riff from the Saunders chapter in which he vows to make the interview "as good-written as possible. He is good of writing, and I wanted him to see that I could also, too."

The audience seemed to agree, laughing readily at even the mildest of quips, and peppering Offerman with questions for more than half an hour before queuing up for an autograph. Even Ron Swanson would approve.





GUMPTION: RELIGHTING THE TORCH OF FREEDOM WITH AMERICA'S GUTSIEST TROUBLEMAKERS by Nick Offerman; Dutton, 400 pp., \$26.95

The bookmark I've been using as I read this book is a coupon for a free doughnut from Dunkin Donuts. I deliberately chose this to mark my progress through Nick Offerman's somewhat humorous exegesis of his spin on American exceptionalism because if a piece of paper that fits into the palm of your hand that's worth a hunk of fried glazed dough isn't the epitome of American ideals, I don't know what is.

And yet there are as many interpretations of what and who constitute our nation's sense of itself, and Offerman uses this collection to stake his claim in the conversation. Perhaps unintentionally modeled after John F. Kennedy's Profiles in Courage, Offerman's personal hall of

fame demonstrates what he defines as "gumption" (the courage to make the world a better place, along the same lines of our nation's storied Founding Fathers) and what it means to "relight the torch of freedom" within this context. Over the course of these 21 essays, Offerman combines assiduously researched biographical profiles, interviews, and personal reflections to assemble a composite of American gumption through a fairly left-leaning lens. The result is moderately funny, at times thought-provoking, and mostly interesting.

Offerman is clearly circumspect about his place in the world and how he can do his part to improve it. As a humorist-cum-social critic, he's

no Mark Twain, but there are a few genuine belly laughs to be found in these pages. But Offerman often strains to be politically correct while also grandstanding on the myriad ways we've murdered our planet; he's clearly sincere, but he's also not guite as evolved as he would like us to think he is. It may be difficult to relate to some of the ideas he's espousing when: a) he uses phrases like "the woods were infested with Native Americans," and b) he writes about sitting down to lunch at Chez Panisse with Michael Pollan. If you could boil down the essence of hipster white male privilege into two sentence fragments, it would be those.

At the very least, Gumption may inspire readers to compile their own lists of Americans who have deployed their ideals in service to a higher cause. I'll start with the genius who came up with the idea of a coupon for a free doughnut.

a nervous ailment and a darkened family history. The trio's inevitable fall from grace (and financial means) spurs a dangerous cross-Atlantic journey of salvation: They hope that traveling to the Scottish Highlands in search of the Loch Ness monster will ensure redemption for Ellis and his estranged father (whose own failed Nessie hunt brought ridicule to the family name). After a hellacious boat trip rife with bombs and violent illness, Maddie and the boys find themselves at the mercy of a surly innkeeper in a remote Scottish village shrouded in mysticism and secrets.

Researched to a T, with wartime factoids tucked into nearly every scene, this novel is a fairy tale, to be sure, but its richly sewn quilt of monsters lurking, chauvinistic debauchery, unintended self-discovery, and hardwon female camaraderie anchor the story. Romance – for the Disney princess and her entourage of barmaids - is the story's core, but the first-person narrative offers a unique look at the limited choices of many women to deal with soulless marriages, domestic violence, threats of lobotomy, lifelong loneliness, addiction, death, and a lack of education. As she scrubs off her rouge and rolls up her sleeves, Maddie's growing thirst for knowledge in her new world of blackout curtains and food rations propels her through grief and opens her to the possibilities of love, friendship, and most importantly, self-respect. There's a high concentration of cheese and

A TOUCH OF STARDUST by Kate Alcott

Doubleday, 296 pp., \$25
For those still mourning the departure of the Harry Ransom Center's engrossing "The Making of Gone With the Wind" exhibit, Kate Alcott's newest

piece of historical fiction aims to give readers their Scarlett-and-Rhett fix at least until the Paramount Theatre screens the beloved film in September. A Touch of Stardust may not be revolutionary, but its enticing peek behind the scenes of Gone With the Wind as it's being made, seen through the eyes of the winningly naive but ambitious aspiring author Julie Crawford, makes it a delectable summer treat.


Stardust isn't exactly a scandalous tell-all. The portraits of studio heavy-hitters like Clark Gable's paramour, Carole Lombard, who takes on Julie as her personal assistant, are generous and appealing for their intimacy and humanity. Via her work for Lombard and a burgeoning romance with David O. Selznick's wry but charming assistant producer, our plucky heroine observes key moments in the GWTW production process and begins a promising career as a screenwriter. Native Midwesterner Julie hits all the expected character beats as she transforms from country mouse to city mouse, but that narrative familiarity holds a certain appeal to devotees of early Hollywood romantic comedies.

Alcott's ease with Thirties lingo and her intimate knowledge of the Old Hollywood gossip mill grounds the story's frothier elements. (She credits her late husband, Frank Mankiewicz, who grew up in Beverly Hills in a family of screenwriters and directors, with authenticating many of the book's details.) Likewise, Alcott's acknowledgment of the era's less sparkling elements – the regular

humiliations endured by black actors, Gable's homophobic discomfort with director George Cukor, the anti-Semitism underlying many Americans' disinterest in engaging in a war with Hitler – elevates the novel above pure fantasia.

Reading A Touch of Stardust has the appeal of popping open a can of Sofia Champagne: It might not be top-shelf, but it gets just close enough to the glamour to make you feel extravagant and put a twinkle in your eye.

THE CULT OF TRULAND by Kevin Brass Glowing Sand Media, 350 pp., \$15.95 (paper)

For several entertaining years (2004-10), Kevin Brass was the *Chronicle*'s media reporter, delivering sharp insight and breezy bons mots, as in his profile of Bush press secretary and former San Diegan PR lady Dana Perino: "Relaxed and confident at the podium, she appears not to possess the sweat gene, an essential gift for a spokesperson." Brass has traveled the world and soaked up a wide range of pop culture, and it sparkles over the edges of his first novel.

At first, *The Cult of Truland*, set in southern California, reads like a frothy beach book, albeit with an undertow that grows stronger as it goes on. Nominally, it's the story

of Jake Truland (not, of course, his "real" name), one of the modern era's celebrities famous for, well, being celebrities. Jake is sort of a writer, known for a booklike object called The Book of Truisms - apparently a collection of aphorisms about fame and its amusements. Otherwise, his means of support are a little vague - "I'm famous, not rich," he tells a casino owner trying pointedly to reinforce Jake's focus on his putative current employment, steering celebrities to the penthouse suite.

A dark thread runs through the otherwise lighthearted narrative, which opens with a mysterious fire at Truland's beach home and is intermittently marked by flying bullets, blackmail, a car chase or two, even a congressional investigation. It's all good publicity, thinks Jake, until these seemingly inconsequential episodes suddenly begin to have real consequences, first to strangers and then to the handful of people closest to him - themselves strangers to the world of "celebrity." (Austin has a sentimental cameo as a place in flyover country where, presumably, sanity and common sense still reign. Brass may have a soft spot for us, but I suspect he could set a novel here that would generate plenty of satirical bite.)


"What I did, my line of work ... I thought it was fun and there was no harm," Truland tells a bloviating congressman. "I was wrong. It has repercussions.... People have died. I have to come to grips with that." Jake does, apparently, come to grips with the repercussions of his paparazzi'd life, although Brass is coy about the final outcome and the book's "mysteries" are never quite solved. I could imagine Jake returning as a reluctant Lew Archer, stumbling over famous bodies and trying to sort the wicked from the good. I hope he does. - Michael King


The book begins in Paris - always a good setting for a murder mystery. After all, the concept of modern crime detection originated there in the early 1800s, drawn from the spidery web of Eugène François Vidocq, the

EXPLORING CALVIN & HOBBES

by Bill Watterson

Andrews McMeel Publishing, 160 pp., \$19.99 (paper)

When comic strips cease, they die. Syndication, that which brought them into mass culture via newspapers, keeps Charlie Brown alive and kicking, only he's not. Day after day, week after week, year in and year out – the pulse of the panels matches ours. Its seasons are our spring, summer, and fall. That grind ultimately halted Calvin & Hobbes at 10, 1985-1995. "Time off and reruns were not allowed in [the early] days," laments Bill Watterson in a rare Q&A at the heart of Exploring Calvin & Hobbes. Subtitled "An Exhibition Catalogue," this addition to a bestselling series of adventures with a 6-year-old and his stuffed tiger follows a retrospective of Watterson's comic gold mine at the Billy Ireland Cartoon Library & Museum at Ohio State University, which houses the author's Calvin & Hobbes collection. See? A museum piece. And yet, 35 pages of the notoriously pressshy Watterson equals a full-on autobiography about a humorist whose universality finally mirrors that of his base inspiration, Peanuts. A boy and his beagle paved the way for a kid and his feline. "Peanuts made me want to be a cartoonist," he opens the Inspiration chapter, reprinting Snoopy, Pogo, Krazy Kat, Flash Gordon, Doonesbury, and Bloom County ("A fun rival strip, and I used it to spur myself on"). We also learn what we knew all along ("Hobbes was as much my alter ego as Calvin was") and suspected: "The running joke in the strip, where the dad talks about 'building character,' is my dad all through." A kitty named Sprite is outed as well. Ultimately, there's the obvious. "The



characters were very alive to me," says Watterson simply, and the Calvin & Hobbes strips that follow, grouped by "Seasons," "Devices," "The Meaning of Life," "Sundays," etc., bear that out with a perennial wit and wisdom that can tickle you 'til your eyes water. Calvin & Hobbes turns 30 this year, but marks 20 winters since the pair's final sled liftoff. Even in a museum, that's life.

Parisian master criminal-turned-detective (who, later in his career, was imprisoned for fraud). Marston is en route to a dinner date with the stepdaughter of a friend at Pont de l'Alma, a historic arch bridge over the Seine - near that fateful tunnel which, in 1997, was the site of au décès tragique de la princesse de Galles, Lady Diana. The stepdaughter is a no-show, but Marston fortuitously arrives in time to direct the retrieval of another young lady from the river. Quicker than you can say, "I am Vidocq, master detective!" Marston has conducted a one-minute inquest and concluded she was murdered.

When two flics (French policemen) arrive on the scene, the senior examines Marston's credentials and gushes, "Attendez, you're Hugo Marston?" A mutual friend, he says, regards the American G-man as "some kind of crime-solving superhero."

Marston and company discover that the stepdaughter, who had a false front as a fashion model, was in fact a dancer at a sleazy strip club. Soon we're off to Barcelona, searching for the mysterious stranger who was the young woman's last known contact. ¿Qué sigue? Con una velocidad asombrosa, they find her father - Marston's friend standing over the stranger. You guessed it: Está muerto.

Merde! as one says in France when one has really stepped in it.

The chase is afoot, leading down a path studded with murder, mayhem, drugs, prison gangs, and the grand tradition of deduction and analysis. Pryor, who also writes a humorous blog showing himself in a fedora and pop-collar overcoat, whisks the reader through sweet European locations with the lightness of a perfect croissant. Despite the tongue-in-cheek tone of this review, I found Marston a much more pleasant companion than the more vocal gun-toting Texans in the

MISSING by Sam Hawken

Serpent's Tail, 384 pp., \$14.95 (paper)

Jack Searle is the protagonist – "hero" might be too straightforward a term - of Missing, the new border crime novel by Sam Hawken. A 57-year-old widower in Laredo, Jack is trying to make ends meet as a contractor while raising his teenage stepdaughters. He drives a battered Ford F-250, watches his cholesterol, occasionally downs his first beer of the evening before shutting the fridge door, and dyes the errant gray whiskers in his goatee black. He's a white guy who married a Mexican national, Vilma, who died of cancer. The daughters were hers from a previous marriage. We meet Jack the morning after a night of rotten sleep - though



we never learn if it's because of encroaching middle age, continuing grief over the loss of Vilma, or a combination of assorted blues. His first stop of the day is Home Depot. where he hires a Mexican immigrant named Eugenio as a helper for \$8 an hour. After a dusty, labor-intensive eight hours, he tells Eugenio, "You do good work," and gives him an extra \$6, as if that's a lot of money.

Jack is solid, not brilliant, and as badly as he aches inside and out, not wholly sympathetic. When his daughter Marina and her cousin are kidnapped leaving a concert in Nuevo Laredo, Jack storms across the border with his pistol, determined to get the girls back, to hell with anyone who says "Be reasonable ... be patient ... we're doing all we can right now ... you are endangering everyone by your rash, unthinking, Ugly American actions and words." Actually, I made up that last one, If you're looking for topical matter for an old-time country & western song, give Jack a look.

For my money, the more interesting figure here is Gonzalo Soler, a lowly inspector for Nuevo Laredo's municipal police. A cipher of a public servant, Soler lives in squalor, working heroically within the system, in a country broken by dysfunction, drug lords, and the idiotic American drug wars. When the Mexican military disbands the local police department and Soler is relieved of duty, all hope for getting the girls back appears lost. Somewhat predictably, Jack storms into the fray, to hell with the consequences. For some of us who cooled on that kind of thing after getting our fill of Jim Thompson and Quentin Tarantino, torturing horrible villains and daring the drug cartels in their backyard may feel a little over-the-top. But if that's your bag, Hawken has an F-250 full of other stories for you: Juárez Dance, The Dead Women of Juárez, La Frontera, and Tequila Sunset. Hawken brings passion and a stripped-down narrative style to the calamitous environs of our borderlands on the south, where he seems to be on heartbreakingly familiar turf. J.S.

Bush 43 ponders murder and existentialism while debating Kerry in Capital T Theatre's ambitious *The Strangerer*

Recall, if you will, the 2004 presidential election. On what turned out to be the losing side, there was John Kerry, labeled a heady New England elitist, and on the other was George W. Bush, who achieved re-election despite what many judged to be an inability to articulate ideas of any complexity. It's hard to explain how that happened. Even today, many people - progressives, mostly - mock Bush for his perceived shallowness and intellectual weaknesses. **STRANGERER**

Enter Mickle Maher, the fiercely intellectual Chicago playwright, and his play The Strangerer, in which he places Bush's apparent bafflement within the context of the chal-

lenging work of French existential writer Albert Camus, and creates a play that takes place during a 90-minute debate between Kerry (Ken Webster) and Bush (Robert Pierson), moderated by Jim Lehrer (Jason Phelps).

The concept is hugely ambitious, as are most of Maher's plays, and ultimately it's not something that parses in the way of most theatre. Under Mark Pickell's direction, Capital

> T's production seems about as clear as a staging of a script like this can be. As a narrative structure, the debate is merely a launching point for Bush's philosophical soul-searching through the ideas explored in the major works of

> > Camus: murder, mortality, the creation of meaning, and so on. The tension sustained from beginning to end is between Bush's inability to explain the reasons for his character's actions and his character's driving desire to

create meaning out of what appears senseless.

It is important to note that all three men in the play are characters that draw from the historical figures, but are more useful here as tools to demonstrate the problem of rec-



onciling conflicting understandings of our own existence. (Like I said: hugely ambitious.) We see Pierson's portrayal of Bush's squint, and Webster affects a little of Kerry's artificial air. But close impersonations perhaps would not have been as valuable as the looser portrayals that the cast pursue, because the entire story of the play is essentially unmoored. An SNL-style parody would have failed in the face of a plot whose relationship with reality is distant at best.

The purpose here is not to mock Bush any more than he already has been, nor is it to demand rhetorically, once again, why Kerry could not pull off a win in 2004. It's to make use of Bush's apparent dunderheaded confusion to demonstrate that we are all frankly lost in the face of the meaninglessness that Camus conveys through his fiction.

About that: I didn't re-read The Stranger before seeing the production, relying instead on my memory of an undergraduate experience of Camus' writings. A friend did re-read The Stranger before seeing the show. We were left with similar impressions.

The Strangerer is a fiercely intellectual exercise. It lacks much of the active staging that drove other Capital T productions of Maher's plays, but it's not without value or humor. And like those other plays, it defies expectations.

It's a bit of a shame, really: We enter the theatre, see the contemporary living room set and the four-person cast list, and think we know what we're in for. "Now's the part where the uninvited guest shows up," we posit. And, right on cue, the doorbell rings, followed by 90 minutes of "we weren't expecting company," clanking glasses, and divulged family secrets. Zach Theatre's Mothers and Sons might come across that way at first (and certainly has some of these elements), but, with its heavy-hitting subject matter and fine performances, this is one play with a sofa center stage that won't put you to sleep.

Acclaimed playwright Terrence McNally skips the formalities and cuts right to the chase: At lights up, the dour Katharine Gerard is already standing in Cal Porter's high-end New York City apartment, scowling while he points out the view of the Met from the window. No, she won't let him take her lavish fur coat - she won't be staying. Mrs. Gerard's contempt for Cal is palpable, and we quickly learn why: About 20 years prior, Cal was in a long-term relationship with her son, André, whose AIDSrelated death she has always blamed on Cal. Her visit to his apartment is only their second meeting; their first was at André's memorial service.

So why has she flown up from Dallas to New York two decades after her son's death, dropping in on his former lover whom she barely knows? The answers flow in piecemeal, through anecdotes, play posters, and yellowing photographs stored in a shoebox. With her transparent jealousy and confusion at the arrival of Cal's handsome young husband. Will, and their son, Bud. Mrs. Gerard's intentions come more crisply

into focus: She's there to ensure Cal is as miserable as she is. To her chagrin, he seems to be - and is - doing exceptionally well, and is actually living a life with Will that societal barriers simply didn't permit for Cal and André years ago.

Four-time Emmy Award-winner Michael Learned is fantastic as Mrs. Gerard. Serving up acerbic lines and emotional subtleties in equal parts, Learned creates an incredibly realistic, intentionally unlikable character. Zach favorite Martin Burke feeds off her energy, his overwrought portrayal of Cal remaining steady enough that his welltimed outbursts are that much more powerful. Nicholas Rodriguez rounds out the adult cast as Will, adding charm and humor.

The living room itself - that is, the set designed by Michelle Ney - is a gorgeously decorated apartment that many Austinites might be clamoring to buy before the end of the run.

As its name would suggest, Mothers and Sons is a play about families. What McNally accomplishes so well is leaving the overdone dysfunctional nuclear family behind to comment on multiple family types and multiple generations. Mrs. Gerard laments that her death will end the Gerard line. Cal speaks of a different lost generation - that of the pioneers in the fight against AIDS and the death of the stigma and shame they were all too accustomed to at that time. According to Cal, this death shouldn't be celebrated: "First it will be a chapter in a history book, then a paragraph, then a footnote It's already started to happen. I can feel it happening. All the raw edges of pain dulled, deadened, drained away," Dave Steakley and his team at Zach have done an exquisite job of helping us preserve these memories. - Elissa Russell guarantee deal with Cap City on this one, we would, because we know this man will have you howling, friend. 

Elizabeth McDonald's "I Only Know Plenty" introduces paintings, sculpture, and video work that expound upon the social construct of scapegoating, an age-old tactic that seeks to deflect conversations about institutionalized inequality by emphasizing personal failure. The artist follows scapegoating through its three primary stages: blame, sacrifice, and purification. Utilizing imagery from Eastern, Western, and online cultures, she creates a globally inclusive portrait of cultural alienation.

Minami's Contrition, which references newer instances of scapegoating, draws directly from the public experience of Minami Minegishi. a J-Pop star who took to YouTube in 2013 to express regret for her immodest behavior (spending the night at her boyfriend's house). Her tearful apology included a new look: a freshly shaved head that was to indicate her utter remorse. McDonald captures Minegishi mid-sob with a deft hand, producing an image that is powerful, communicative, and painful, and one that confronts the absurdity of this public act head-on. The primary figures

in the exhibition are women, and the images in works such as Two Kneeling Women and Crouching cement a tradition of women acting as conduits for both blame and absolution.

In McDonald's exhibitions, her paintings often take center stage, and so it is here. All That Ever Was, a huge work of oil and watercolor on canvas, anchors grayDUCK's space. It is an undeniable force, both of effort from McDonald and in its perspective of digital immolation in online cultures. All That Ever Was feels like the artist's most holistic representation of scapegoating, presented in a medium that McDonald has truly mastered.

But it is in the overall repetition that the efficacy of "I Only Know Plenty" begins to wane. With 37 pieces in the show, the gallery feels cluttered and the show's thesis stifled. That isn't to say that McDonald doesn't deliver strong work in each piece - she does. Curation, however, is key in providing scope for such an ambitious exhibition. It remains the only element that "I Only Know Plenty" lacks.

DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Old School Leathersmith in Lockhart lives up to its name. When you walk into the tiny shop, half a block off the courthouse square, the smell of tanned hide engulfs you in a warm embrace from the past.

In the back of the shop, Mark and Jan Bessette labor with hand tools and a sharp eye. This summer, the couple will add custom-made boots to their repertoire of handbags, saddlebags, belts, holsters, and hat bands made to customers' specifications.

"These days," Mark says, "shoes and boots are made to throw away, not be repaired," although the shop still offers the service when practical.

Jan agrees. She holds up a \$300 pair of famous-maker boots as an example. The cowboy had worked in them for three months and the soles were completely worn through. The fancy shafts of the boots looked practically new.

Mark says he can make a pair of boots that will last six or seven repairs, or a lifetime - depending on how hard you work in them. The trick is to use good, dense leather at the stress points. A well-made custom boot uses horse butt leather at the welt, where the upper is sewn to the sole. Mark says the hide from the horse's hindquarters is tough, but doesn't take dye well. It's the old-school way of making boots that will last.

Aztex Settle on a New Home

The **Austin Aztex** announced Tuesday that they'll be finishing out their season at Round Rock ISD's Kelly Reeves Athletic Complex (10211 W. Parmer, just north of Lakeline Blvd.), with all remaining home games kicking off at 7:30pm. Kelly Reeves seemed the most likely option all along, after House Park was trashed by the recent flood - it's where the Aztex practice, so the team is comfortable with the field, and they already had a relationship with RRISD.

The Aztex held off the Sacramento Republic 1-0 Sunday in front of a sell-out crowd of 11.442. Despite being outshot 20-4, the Aztex scored on their only shot of the second half - a nice finish by leading scorer Kris Tyrpak - to beat the reigning league champs, and move back into playoff position in the tightly packed USL West. 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TEXAS HONEY HAM IS STILL A NEIGHBORHOOD CLASSIC

I was supposed to write this piece more than a year ago, but fate (and a burglar) had other plans. On Saturday morning, March 8, 2014, Texas Honey Ham Company in West Lake was on fire, the result of a burglaryarson. As a writer on deadline, this was an extremely upsetting event, because that meant that I was suddenly out of a story. As a diner who had grown rather fond of this sweet little shop on Bee Caves Road, I feared that the community faced an enormous, potentially irreplaceable, loss.

I first learned about Texas Honey Ham through Deana Saukam, whose Facebook page one morning displayed a tableau of breakfast tacos and a generous slice of ham nestled into a pancake. Curious, I went to the shop to refuel with

a breakfast taco after a morning run on Town Lake. All it took was one visit to convince me that I'd been missing out on 10 years of exceptional breakfast tacos. (Side note: West Lake is an alien hamlet to me. Beyond my understanding that they've got a better school district and a generally tonier populace, I've never been particularly curious about what's going on along that stretch of Bee Caves Road from MoPac to 360. Shame on me, it turns out.)

Texas Honey Ham is one of those iconic gathering places endemic to small communities.

Photos and newspaper articles adorn the walls and are relevant to and reflective of the clientele. Patriarchs clap shoulders jovially and discuss the latest doings on the links or Junior's great catch at Friday night's game. Mothers share tips about ski vacations or Montessori schools. Teen girls gossip while teen boys jostle one another. These kinds of gatherings can happen at any given cafe in any given town; but what brings people back is the food.

Texas Honey Ham is open for breakfast

and lunch, through 6pm (so, you could squeeze in an early dinner or order in bulk to serve later). The breakfast tacos (\$1.99) are pretty standard, customizable with any two base items including eggs, bacon, sausage, and the cafe's signature baked

potato hash (basically, mashed loaded baked potatoes; it's delicious). They were an early favorite in my initial visits, but I'm also a fan of the ham sandwich (\$6.49 full, \$4.29 half), which is a straightforward version of the classic, served between generous slices of griddled white or wheat bread. Order a side of shells and cheese (\$2.70) or apple slaw (\$2.49) and you've got an appetizing lunch that transcends the workday.

Cold days are well suited for ham bone soup, which marries seven kinds of beans

and pulled pork for a savory, umami-rich stew that hits all the comfort food receptors. It's a special treat atop the house Frito pie (\$4.99 small, \$6.49 large), which also includes pulled pork, shredded cheese, and housemade honey barbecue sauce (I like to add a few dashes of hot sauce to mine). Steer clear of the Frigas (\$6.99), though, which are simply too Frito-forward to be a successful interpretation of migas.

On my first visit back to Texas Honey Ham after it reopened back in September, I was pleasantly surprised to see that nothing had changed in the shop, from the layout to the menu, to the quality of the food. Said Rob Siller, who co-owns the shop with his friends Kelly Weiss and Trent Hunt, rapping his knuckles on the upgraded stainless steel counters, "You know why it's all the same? Because it works." - Melanie Haupt

all well and good to congratulate restaurants and businesses there who are taking care of their neighbors out there, but spending some money in Wimberley would help, too. They are open for business.

Probably the biggest news is that, as a result of his new position as executive chef at the restaurant at the

Radisson (111 E. Cesar Chavez), David Garrido has decided not to pursue the development of his own restaurant at Lamar Union.

IN MEMORIAM Two Austin restaurant families have experienced painful losses recently. Family patriarch Paul Kinsella, co-founder of the Emerald Restaurant, has passed, and services were held May 21 and 22. Kinsella and his wife Marge opened the Emerald in 1984 and ran the Bee Cave eatery with their children, who continue his legacy. In recent years, the location became less rural, but the Emerald never lost its old-world charm. Kinsella is survived by a large extended family and will be buried beside his wife in Ireland's County Mayo. Dr. Foo Swasdee and her family are grieving the loss of her nephew, Vipop (Bose) Lopitakwong, who was killed in an auto accident June 1. After his Marine training, Bose had been working closely with his aunt at Satay to learn all aspects of the restaurant and catering business before his untimely death. He is survived by family members in America and Thailand. We offer our sincere condolences to both families.

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s the story goes, shrimp has been one of my favorites since I was around 8 months old and my dad snuck me a piece. I cried until he'd surrendered every last one on his plate. Served every way, from boiled peel-and-eats to scampi to barbecued and grilled, I love it. But I'm also a voracious consumer of information, and the health and environmental concerns about the scrumptious little crustaceans are terrifying. It's time to write some new fish stories. So let's start small ... very small. The number one most consumed seafood product in the world is shrimp. Little things can have a big impact.

Austin is uniquely positioned as a food-conscious city with world-class chefs. And we boast sustainable options for just about any food - from beef to broccoli to bugs - but our public awareness of the seafood market, although moving forward, is still lagging. "Austin is a landlocked city, but we're very close to the coast," said supplier Louis LeSassier. "A very fruitful coast. Our bays and estuaries are some of the most prolific in the nation in terms of seafood and fish hatcheries." LeSassier, and his "co-shrimper in crime" Laine Martin, sells wild-caught shrimp through his family-owned, small-scale business, the Shrimp Connection. Fourthgeneration shrimpers, the guys run operations while uncles and cousins work the fleet of eight boats in the Gulf of Mexico. Every week they bring the catch up from the coast, to sell at two weekend farmers' markets - Barton Creek and Bluebonnet Flea.

LeSassier is critical of many of the industry norms. "You'd be horrified by the stuff they put in some shrimp," says LeSassier of many overseas purveyors and shrimp farmers. "It's laced, riddled with chemicals and diseases, and it's funky. They're selling funky shrimp." Shrimp has some unique health benefits and is purported to fight cancer, weight issues, and type 2 diabetes, but that's assuming they aren't raised in a toxic environment or dipped in a chemical cocktail. While the Shrimp Connection uses EverFresh, an allnatural preservative made of plum seed extract, on the boats, that's an unusual practice in the industry. And LeSassier's sustainable practices aside, it can still be difficult to know whether wild-caught is any better than farmed shellfish.

In May, the nonprofit Texas Shrimp Association (TSA) hosted its 65th annual convention. The attendees are deeply passionate about all aspects of shrimp not just chef Andre Natera's stunning spread of white and brown wild-caught beauties on the buffet. Dr. Benny Gallaway exemplifies that passion. A Texas A&M Ph.D. marine biologist, he has also been the president of LGL Ecological Research Associates since 1974. The private firm works extensively with fishery management and spends a great deal of time handling bycatch, especially sea turtles and finfish such as red snapper. They work with entities from governments to conservation organizations to private sector companies.

I asked Dr. Gallaway to give it to me straight: Is wildcaught better than farmed? "Give me wild-caught every time," he replied. "Frankly, I'm afraid of farm-raised products." There are a slew of reasons. Gallaway and LeSassier both mentioned the high doses of antibiotics and chemicals added to conventional commercial fish farms. The problems are similar to land factory farms: Excessive numbers of organisms (multimillions, in the case of shrimp) in a small contained area are prone to disease. To counteract that, additives many believe are not safe for human consumption are added. It's not just a health issue; taste changes too. Muscle structure doesn't grow properly in cramped quarters, changing the natural texture and flavor of the shrimp. In contrast, Gallaway says of wild-caught shrimp, "It's a mighty big ocean out there. It's hard to overcrowd the ocean because it has a large carrying capacity."

Ocean pollutants are also a public concern, but for Gallaway, it's a matter of comparison. He says, "If you look at pollution and if you look at concentrations in the water column, and you look at the concentrations wild-caught seafood is exposed to, there is far less concern than with farm-raised fish. You've got them in a 1/4-acre pond pumping chemicals in, and that's compared to even a small body of water like the Gulf of Mexico. Dilution is not the solution, but you have to consider dilution and the size of the body of water. I mean, of course, consuming any raw seafood, vou're taking a chance."

That's especially true if you consider that the majority of the United States' seafood comes from overseas - a staggering 86% by some estimates, with half or more coming from aquafarms. Much of the shrimp (and fish) sold at grocery stores and restaurants are the lowest quality, because it's

exchanged at a lower price. International regulations are thin, and the mandates in place are loosely enforced (if at all). In some countries, such as Thailand and Vietnam, the ecological implications of shrimping are brutal. LeSassier said, "They raise in mangrove estuary areas which is really bad environmentally ... because it creates oxygen-depleted zones in the water, as well as [being] a very, very heavy pollutant." These countries also fail to enforce regulations on shrimp diet. In nature, they eat zooplankton, but in the unmonitored farms, shrimp are reportedly fed just about anything, including pig and chicken excrement. Sanitary conditions, including personnel practices and ice for packing, are also cited as problematic.

Treaties and import inspections exist, but are largely overlooked. Less than 10% of imported food products are inspected by the FDA. For perspective, Gallaway says most "European countries won't even take the shrimp that we routinely import. We routinely get these products dumped on the U.S. that aren't acceptable to most civilized countries."

Despite no real sustainable fishery management practices in place globally, the United States' shrimp industry has made enormous strides, but there's still a ways to go. Differences exist between federal and state jurisdiction (distance from shore), and the measurements of fish populations determine how many of which kinds of seafood may be caught and sold. "It's a tricky business trying to decide what the balance is," says Gallaway. "Shrimp are kind of like mosquitoes. Their life cycle is about a year, and one female can produce all the young necessary for a huge population. They're literally more like insects than fish. It's hard to overfish them, so the shrimp fishery is never managed based on shrimp yield. It's based on bycatch."

Bycatch used to be a huge environmental problem, and though still a concern, the numbers have improved dramatically. In the Seventies, the haul of unwanted fish was around 10 pounds per 1 pound of shrimp caught. Currently,

it's measured around 2.5 pounds to 1. Progress includes ongoing efforts to minimize fuel consumption, improve trolling nets to minimize seafloor damage, and enforce federally mandated turtle excluder devices (TEDs) and other bycatch reduction devices (BRDs), for species such as red snapper. TSA (Texas Shrimp Association) reports a 97% compliance with TEDs, and Gallaway explained that the red snapper population is at higher levels than seen in decades. Some activists have been slow to accept that fact, resulting in continued public misinformation.

In a February 2015 article for National Geographic, Megan Westmeyer, fishery analyst for Sustainable Fisheries Partnership wrote, "Fishery improvement projects (FIPs) are based on the premise that the seafood industry itself is the strongest force for driving improvements in fisheries, and a group of shrimp suppliers from the Gulf of Mexico has shown us how it's done." LGL research is referenced: "The overall conclusion of the study was that none of these bycatch species exhibited trends that would warrant concern. While further studies, especially full-fledged stock assessments, would be helpful, we believe this study indicates that the shrimp fishery does not pose a risk of serious or irreversible harm to the main bycatch species."

So, shrimp is now safer for the sea, but what's the best choice for sourcing? Local is still the key. For wild-caught shrimp, that means the Gulf of Mexico, or at least U.S. shores. Monterey Bay Aquarium Seafood Watch does provide an app to identify best seafood buying practices, but the shrimp part is somewhat confusing. Texas is never listed specifically, but rather lumped into the Gulf options, which, depending on trawling method, are listed as "good alternatives" (Alaska tops the list). Knowing your source is absolutely essential, and around Austin, you've got wholesalers like the Shrimp Connection, K&S Seafood, Quality Seafood, and San Miguel Seafood (available to the public at Mongers Market + Kitchen). If H-E-B or Central Market is more convenient, check labels for country of origin. For dining out, try restaurants that source responsibly and ask questions. Responsible North American and European aquaculture is a viable option according to some sources. but taste can be a useful gauge of a shrimp's overall health. Consumer education is essential to sustainability, and I can guarantee I'll put my money where my mouth is - one plateful of wild-caught Gulf shrimp at a time.

ALCOMAR IS AN INSTANT VACATION

Even though Austin is a couple hundred miles from sandy beaches, a visit to Alcomar is sure to evoke the memories of a seaside sojourn with ocean breezes. The Latin-inspired eatery from Carlos Rivero's El Chile Group offers fresh seafood from Gulf Coast and West Coast waters in a variety of enticing preparations. The recently refurbished old South Austin restaurant building now has a clean and airy feel to it with polished concrete floors, basket light fixtures, and sun streaming in through windows draped with nautical macramé. A large bar dominates the dining room, the furniture is comfortable, and the graceful octopus logo adorns both the interior and exterior whitewashed walls. Everything about this place says vacation at the beach.

Alcomar is the realization of several inspirations, Maribel Rivero, Carlos Rivero's sister, is a graduate of the Latin Flavors program at the Culinary Institute of America's San Antonio campus, and she spent time traveling and researching cuisines in Central and South America after graduation. Her travels are reflected in some of the dishes and cocktails. While Alcomar takes its name from a mashup of the last names of El Chile Group chefs Alma Alcocer-Thomas and Jeff Martinez, the restaurant bears much more than their names. These longtime collaborators, both alumni of the kitchens at Jeffrey's and Fonda San Miguel, bring both style and substance to the approachable menu.

Our group of six stopped in for a brunch to benefit the culinary grant program of the Austin Food & Wine Alliance, and we ate our way through the entrées on the almuerzo (lunch) menu, sharing appetizers and desserts. We chose to start with mushroom gorditas (\$10) for our shared appetizer - pil-

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lowy masa boats topped with white bean puree, Manchego cheese, and meaty roasted mushrooms in a chipotle sauce, with a gilding of avocado. The gorditas offered an appealing mélange of flavors and textures while being both vegetarian and gluten-free.

Our entrée choices were uniformly satisfying, and all the colorful plates were as attractive to the eye as to the palate, without a hint of that overly tortured, tweezered application style that some chefs resort to lately.

The seasonal soft-shell crab torta (\$14) presents two crisply fried crabs on a bolillo accented by a tangy grilled lemon aioli and pickled onions, with rich, buttery slices of avocado to smooth things out. The poblano, goat cheese, and spinach quiche (\$13) has a winning combination of flavors encased in a tender, butter crust, paired with a salad of delicate local lettuces. The omelet with



mojo lobster (\$16) features the same good poblano and goat cheese combo matched with dainty spring asparagus, napped with a voluptuous mantle of toothsome lobster in a pale pink mojo sauce. If there's a better omelet in town right now, I'd be hard-pressed to name it. Like the omelet, the Manchego shrimp (\$19) is a menu item that would draw me back to Alcomar on my own dime - plump Gulf shrimp are arranged on a luxurious pool of silken atole corn sauce, topped with a crunchy crown of Manchego cheese and herbed bread crumbs, and enlivened by a piquant chile arbol aioli and flavor bombs

> of grilled cherry tomatoes. The most visually stunning plate on the table that day had to be the butternut poblano relleno (\$19), a roasted pepper stuffed with seasoned squash puree sitting on a bed of sautéed Swiss chard, goat cheese, and pistachio


cream sauce under a tangle of marinated onions. This work of culinary art is officially in the running for the most impressive vegetarian dish in town this year.

After reviewing restaurants for more than 20 years, I've learned that the upside of sharing desserts is that six people can usually eat through an entire dessert menu after a substantial meal without feeling too stuffed. The downside, of course, is having to share sweets that are sometimes good enough to hoard. We had all four dessert offerings and were left wanting more. The crème brûlée of the day (\$7) was a Meyer lemon custard

under a crackling crust of caramelized sugar, each spoonful potentially addictive. The chocolate tart (\$8) is the most substantial of the desserts, with a truffle-like ganache filling under a sprinkling of flaked salt. The creamy, comforting rice pudding (\$8) comes with a light fruit syrup and fresh berries, while the hot, cinnamon sugar-dusted buñuelos (\$7) arrived with a pot of sliced strawberries in sweetened whipped cream for dipping.

Our return visit for happy hour allowed the drinkers at the table to sample cocktails while we shared some reduced-price appetizer plates. The Te Amo (\$10), made with Tito's vodka, St. Germain, macerated berries, lemon, agave syrup, and crushed mint was a lovely and refreshing choice, and the wellmade margarita de la casa (\$8, \$5) can be ordered frozen or on the rocks. The cebiche Peruano (\$12, \$9) delivers blushing pink slivers of ahi tuna marinated in an astringent liquid seasoned with aji chile amarillo and ginger, garnished with homemade corn nuts and perfect cubes of sweet potato and yucca. The crab & guac (\$13, \$10) presents a cylinder of guacamole, lump crab, and grilled cubes of pineapple with crisp tostadas, but unfortunately, any essence of crab was missing in action on that particular plate.

Neither meat eaters nor vegetarians should shy away from Alcomar simply because the main focus is on seafood - there are impressive vegetarian options and worthwhile meat dishes for carnivores. The Texas Wagyu hanger steak (\$35) pairs wood-grilled steak with poblano, goat cheese, and lobster mojo enchiladas, while the half chicken in mole xico (\$21) features juicy, wood-grilled chicken enrobed in dark, complex mole matched with saffron rice and fat slices of sweet fried plantain. We found plenty to like on the menu at Alcomar and, while the servers were friendly and very well-informed about the food they're serving, there were a couple of noticeable glitches. On both visits, we experienced long waits between the clearing of our entrée plates and the arrival of desserts, and then another long wait for our check. Both times, we were told the time gaps had something to do with having to wait to get on the computer, so perhaps another POS terminal would be helpful for the staff. That being said, I'd go back to Alcomar in a heartbeat. It will probably be as close as I'll come to a beach vacation this year. - Virginia B. Wood



Here are just a few of the locally developed gadgets and apps to remind you that tech people aren't just Google Glass-wearing gentrifiers; they're also making your life better in small ways.

ACTIO DESK ▶ www.actiostandingdesk.com \$1,500-2,600

Seems like every week there's a new article prescribing a better way to interact with your desk. Sitting was the norm, then kneeling was in vogue before ergonomic balls took over. Now, putting pressure on your butt at all is gauche. Standing is all the rage. Well, if variety is the spice of life, perhaps an adjustable desk is the way to go. Whether future studies find stools superior to standing or if swings suspended from the ceiling start trending, Actio Desk changes with the times. A simple click of a button mechanically raises or lowers your work surface. There's even programmable presets to cater to those who flip-flop between various altitudes.

JAMFEED www.jamfeed.com Free

Launched at SXSW just this year, this app aggregates music news you want without the pesky notifications about Katy Perry's beauty regimen (unless you're into that). Search for your favorite bands and music festivals – we found most of the artists we searched for, from Beyoncé to local poppunks Warm Soda. The app scours the Web and delivers the latest content relevant to your interests. Be the first to know about the newest singles and diva beefs, or check to see if any of your musical obsessions are playing near you. Sure, you can follow Kanye West on Twitter, but then you run the risk of knowing more about Kim Kardashian than you want. JamFeed gives you more killer, less filler.

So, you just dropped your phone in the pool or a puddle or the toilet (seriously, stop texting in the bathroom, people). Panic sets in: What if I lose all my selfies or my progress on Candy Crush? Rice is the standard solution, but the trick is to not turn your device back on until it's completely dry. Strangely, rice can be decidedly uncommunicative when it comes to notifying you when the job is done. If you have 30 minutes and \$20, DryBox Rescue can offer you a 70% success rate with phones dried within 24 hours of getting wet. I rarely use Facebook and have never online-dated. The biggest problem in my life is affordability. Soon, I'll no longer be able to afford to live in the city I fell in love with 20 years ago. As far as I can see, your column is for the new people, the tech-boom types who are driving up the cost of living and driving out me and my friends. Got any advice for us "old" Austinites, technology boy?

We feel you, CATLADY. We, too, have noticed a "pod people" phenomenon, where old, familiar faces are steadily replaced around town by newer, fresher, more expensive faces, many of them looking down at their phones. Maybe we're optimists, but we think these new people do have something to offer the city.

At the same time, as a column in a venerable print weekly, we very much aim to serve the old-school Austin as well. That's why, at CATLADY's prompting, we're focusing our next three columns on the affordability crisis. This week: tech-savvy ways to cut expenses.

The techie influx has certainly made Austin pricier. But that same app-driven economy can also help us live more cheaply. One big benefit of living in a plugged-in city is that services that aim to "disrupt" and cut consumer costs can easily reach critical mass here. Take discount aggregators like Groupon, LivingSocial, and ScoutMob. Most coupons you'll find on those apps are for luxuries like spa days and fancy restaurants, true. But a recent scan of deals on an average Tuesday night in June showed a number of solid savings, like 50% off at beloved (and already affordable) Eastside Tex-Mex joint Las Cazuelas.

Along more homegrown lines, local blog CheepieAustin.com lists deals at grocery stores around town, aimed at shoppers who want to eat healthy for less. If you're looking for free activities or drink deals in the palm of your hand, we humbly suggest the Chronicle's Calendar app and GoTime Happy Hour app.

Aside from food, your biggest budget items are likely housing and transportation. No question, the housing market is disastrous right now for those in need. Personal technology can't solve that problem, except perhaps via Airbnb. (We'll discuss that in the next column, among other "sharing economy" income opportunities.) Transportation, however, is a budget category where thinking futuristically could save you real dough.

The recent arrivals of Uber and Lyft (and, soon, the discount shared-ride service UberPool) have revolutionized the transit landscape in Austin. Combine the flexibility of Uber/Lyft with impressive mobile app-driven improvements in Cap Metro's user experience, Car2Go, and a growing bike-share program, and Austin could, accidentally, be turning into a city where car payments, insurance, and gas are optional expenses. That's something old-school transit advocates have repeatedly failed at, but the much-reviled techies are making headway.

Austin, a car-optional city? Maybe we're optimists - but maybe that's our first advice to you in staring down our city's uncertain affordability future, CATLADY. Change is scary, but a little optimism never hurt. :) HD

How many people does it take to change the world? And how long? As it turns out, not all that long, and not nearly as many as you'd think, given the daily deluge of 24-hour bad news issuing from the global media sphere. And speaking of building a better world - or at least fixing the one we have - this year marks the 10th anniversary of the Nobelity Project (www.nobelity.org), the Austin-based nonprofit organization conceived, run, and staffed by writer, filmmaker, actor, and activist Turk Pipkin and his wife and project co-director, Christy.

When we last checked in with the Pipkins in April of 2011, they had just released Building Hope, the third in an ongoing series of documentary films chronicling their work in building infrastructure and secondary educational outlets such as Mahiga Hope High in rural Mahiga, Kenya. Taken alongside 2006's Nobelity - in which Pipkin, inspired by his then-adolescent daughters and what sort of world they'd be growing up in, set about allaying his fatherly fears by interviewing nine Nobel laureates on the best ways to fix the future - and 2009's One Peace at a Time - which turned the first film's wise words into actual doable deeds, such as setting up a system for clean drinking water for the kids of Mahiga – this is the sort of advocacy journalism that literally gets good things done right.

And we mean a lot of things: Mere months after the release of Building Hope, the devastating Bastrop County Complex fires of 2011 erupted, which led the Pipkins to create a program of Texan reforestation they dubbed "Replant the Park." Since then, they've been covering the still stark and fire-blackened Lost Pines Forest with new trees, planted by area high school kids in a hands-on, real-time experiment in educating young people about conservation, reforestation, and local community action.

"I think that first year, the students planted about 25,000 trees," recalls Turk, "and the professional planting that we paid for did about 250,000. We're continuing to go into the park every year. The best part of it is seeing the kids get out there and get their hands dirty. Whether they're from Bastrop High School, farm kids, or from Westlake High School, they bang on the ground with a shovel and it's like solid rock out there. Thirty minutes later, it's like they've been planting trees their whole lives."


Granted, the politics and practice of reforestation wasn't exactly new to the Pipkins, seeing as how they'd previously been partners on the Kieni Youth Million Tree Program, growing something like 20,000 seedings at nurseries in a bold attempt to reforest the decimated Eburu Forest, in partnership with the Rhino Ark Charitable Trust.

But back to Bastrop: "We're going to do probably five or six days in the park this year," Christy explains. "We have another little satellite program where we may be taking this project about global reforesta-

Turk and Christy Pipkin are keeping busy changing the world

tion into middle schools. They're a little young to take to the park because state requirements don't allow them to actually plant on-site, but we'll talk to them about

global reforestation. One of our inspirations and mentors on Nobelity, Wangari Maathai, who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 2004, is how we got to Kenya in the first place. She established the Green Belt Movement, and that idea of local acts having global impacts really came from her. The idea that you

can plant a tree really anywhere and make a contribution to the whole is a great message for middle-school kids."

The list of separate yet related programs and affiliates that the Nobelity Project now comprises reads like a glorious laundry list of good deeds and smart planning, with not a little common sense, and Texan can-do spirit bringing up the rear. The original Mahiga Hope High School Project has acted

as a wellspring for a host of other conservatory and educational outings, among them the Kenva Schools Fund, which is working with some 25 school communities across rural Kenya building classrooms, libraries, and clean water systems. There's also the Roatan Bookmobile, on Roatan Island, Honduras,

which provides free books (and all that that implies) to some 14 rural fishing villages and their 3,500 students.

Two new partnerships aim to expand both Nobelity's global-impact message and educational reach. The Austin-based and charity-minded company ESPEROS (translated loosely from Spanish, "to hope") manufactures "Classic," "Schoolyard," and "Weekend Warrior" backpacks and book bags that will help fund one year of education for a child in the developing world with every sale. Then there's the Turk Nobelity Reserve, a Syrah/Cabernet Sauvignon wine produced by longtime Nobelity supporter Hope Family Wines out of California. Proceeds from every 1.5 liter magnum sold (and it's available at Austin's Twin Liquors, the Clay Pit, and elsewhere, should you feel a tad parched at the moment) go to help fund clean water projects among the Nobelity Project's partner schools in Kenya.

All this and more - a Monarch butterfly program and Wheels for Humanity, among them - have grown, treelike, from Turk and Christy Pipkin's initial inquisitiveness about a dire world situation that has grown only more so over the first decade of the Nobelity Project's life-giving lifespan.

Certainly, the recent incursions into Garissa, Kenya, and the attendant, headline-grabbing kidnappings of schoolgirls by the Somalia-based terrorist group al Shabaab must have made things slightly more dicey for the NGOs like Nobelity and its regional partners, right?


"If al Shabaab is attacking universities," Turk says, "my response is to build more schools. Which is no different from what we're already trying to do, so it just makes me feel like we're on the right track.

"The fear people have of other people's religions in Kenya is the thing that worries me the most," he explains. "The tribal groups seem to be doing a little bit of a better job of mixing over the years because now the young people grow up alongside Masai kids, Turkana kids, and Kikuvu kids, and it's just like here. They don't see each other as black and white like we did in the South when I grew up there. But ultimately, none of that affects where [Nobelity] works, oddly enough. What affected us more was the [2013] mall attack in Nairobi, but we don't spend much time there. I think the rural areas where we work are much safer, more friendly, and the people there know us and we know them."

So the work of saving the world, one peace at a time, continues unabated as the Pipkins' truly noble project looks forward to easing the suffering of wherever they find it. It's a tough job, but somebody's got to do it, and 10 years on, Nobelity has moved mountains and made a measurable difference for the better in countless lives.

"The first film really led us to the nonprofit work," says Christy, "and because Turk visited Kenya, and visited this particular community, and then returned to tell the story about these kids needing to carry water to school, and how they were sick. That's what started this whole thing. And then people came with us. People started sending us checks in the mail. The storytelling leads everything, and so we're raising awareness and funds from this particular story. We didn't set out to build a hundred classrooms and put all these kids in school, but that's what's happened."

Jurassic Juggernaut

Bigger isn't always better

Well, it's better than Jurassic Park III. I'll give them that. This fourth film in the franchise has more than a few snazzy beasties going for it, and the CGI is light years away from the crumpy-cute brontosauruses of Spielberg's monstrously entertaining 1993 original. The skin tones and rolling musculature of the 20-odd species of DNArecombinant dinosaurs seen here glisten and flex with all the natural physiology of how paleontologists currently believe the real things would appear. The same, however, cannot be said for the storyline (which, as in 1993, should stop no one from going to the theatre). Penned by a bevy of screenwriters

and shunted all over the place in the intervening years since we last watched Jurassic Park III's pterodactyls take wing, Jurassic World relies far too heavily on the tried and true and decidedly cliched - from its young protagonists Gray and Zach (Simpkins and Robinson), who are vacationing in the allegedly "safe" (yeah,

right) corporate theme park of the title only to find themselves pursued by, well, you know, to a scheming military evildoer who plans to use velociraptors in lieu of American boots on the ground in upcoming conflicts. "Robots?!" scoffs D'Onofrio's ham-on-wry baddie: "This is the future of war!"

He does have a point, since ex-Marine Owen (former guardian of the galaxy Chris Pratt) appears to have trained these bitey, scrambling eating machines to follow orders to a small extent using, of all things, a dog clicker and a pail of dead rats. Noms! Pratt pulls double duty here (and does it charmingly) as one of the film's requisite love interests. The other half is Howard's Park Manager Claire, a Type-A control freak who manages to misplace her own nephews, Gray and Zach, once the park's newest attraction busts loose and turns out to have far more intelligence than your average Jurassic hybrid. Dubbed the "Indominus rex," this 50-foot mass of razored teeth and predatory rending lavs predictable waste to everything and everyone around it, leading to a final, finally rousing third act that actually merits the word "spectacular." Not so for the rest of the film, sadly.

Director Trevorrow previously helmed the quirky-cool, indie time-travel film Safety Not Guaranteed, and his roots show through as corporate America, product placement and branding, and the amoral corruption of scien-

> tific breakthroughs by mankind's more martial and profit-driven impulses are skewered, snarked, and railed against at every turn. Spielberg, reportedly a very handson exec producer, allows for a few moments of flashback tomfoolery to his earlier films, notably a pair of gags involving a great white

shark and, later on, a couple of oxygen tanks used to foul up the advance of an impending Jurassic attack. Bigger isn't necessarily better, though; he knows this, one must assume. Indominus rex may be fearsome, but the behemoth is ultimately brought down, like Kong, by love. That'd be Spielberg's - and every kid in the world, to be honest – love for another, more archetypal monster, who shall remain unnamed here. It's all in good fun, and critic-proof to boot, but Jurassic World doesn't even come close to that most intimate and dearly coveted "Gosh,

BEYOND THE MASK

D: Chad Burns; with Andrew Cheney, John Rhys-Davies, Kara Killmer, Alan Madlane, Adetokumboh M'Cormack, Charlie Newhart. (PG. 103 min.)

Offering a change of pace from the usual faith-based film dramas, Beyond the Mask is a historical swashbuckler. Even if some of its history and buckles are askew, the film is still an original take on a Christian redemption story.

Having more ambition than apparent budget, Beyond the Mask suffers from a clunky script (by Stephen Kendrick and Paul McCusker) which is full of hackneyed aphorisms and improbable history, beginning in 1775, when mercenary killer William Reynolds (Cheney) tenders his resignation to Charles Kemp, head of the East India Company. Reynolds wants to be through with committing dastardly tasks in India for the conscienceless megacorporation of its day that won't let him out of its clutches. Conveniently, Reynolds swaps identities with a dead parson and manages to convince a whole village that he's the real deal. The object of his affections is Charlotte Holloway (Killmer), a lovely young woman whom he regards as the embodiment of God's mercy and forgiveness. Much to everyone's surprise, Charlotte's uncle turns out to be his former employer, Kemp, and as they say in such situations, the jig is up. Reynolds soon makes his way to the American colonies where, in the spring of 1776, he goes to work for the printer Ben Franklin.

Only John Rhys-Davies manages to imbue his character with any personality, making an excellent villain while elaborately trilling his R's. The remaining actors deliver drab performances, although the film's colorblind casting interestingly features several black men in roles that would be historically dubious. And who knew that Ben Franklin was a secret bomb-maker? While working for Franklin by day, Reynolds commits raids at night as the masked and mysterious Highwayman, who resembles the iconic Lone Ranger. Ultimately,


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Revnolds. Franklin, and the rest of the rebels save the day by foiling a Guy Fawkes-styled detonation of the Continental Congress.

"Only God can give us new lives" is the story's redemptive message. With the brassy, insistent music that swaths every inch of Beyond the Mask, the filmmakers clearly don't want to leave anything to speculation. However, stronger filmmaking technique would go a long way toward delivering a clearer message.

GOOD KILL

D: Andrew Niccol; with Ethan Hawke, January Jones, Bruce Greenwood, Zoe Kravitz, Jake Abel, Kevin Wiggins, Alma Sisneros.

The earnest drama Good Kill provocatively explores the blurred line between an act of war and an act of terrorism in this modern age of human conflict. Today, neither side may tread the higher moral ground, confounding any blind-eye view of a world solely defined by black and white hats. The battle fought in this film takes place in a cloudless sky high above the godforsaken terrain of Afghanistan, where weaponized unmanned aerial vehicles - otherwise known as "drones" - stealthily roam on missions to (using the military terminology) prosecute targets and neutralize threats on the ground below. They're like deadly mechanized insects reimagined from a Fifties sci-fi flick, except they don't instill a visceral fear in the pursued because they operate sight unseen, surreptitious and silent in their killing agenda.

The film clumsily debates the ethical pros and cons of this dispassionate form of warfare: Advocates justify the use of UAVs in the Middle East as a necessary means to combat an enemy capable of using children as suicide bombers or flying commercial jets into skyscrapers, while detractors view it as nothing more than terrorism at 10,000 feet. While these polemics underpin the narrative drama, the soul of Good Kill resides in the men and women who pilot this controversial weaponry halfway around the world in the confines of sterile portable buildings in a Nevada desert not too different from the arid Afghan expanse. For these virtual combatants, it's a surreal, often debilitating experience to play this deadly game of Xbox, one in which the animated figures on the video screen are flesh and bone, and scored hits translate into actual body counts.

As the troubled pilot who yearns to fly a real plane again, Hawke is all stony expression, his face frozen like a mask that might shatter if he allowed his feelings to surface. His Major Egan may not express or show much by way of emotion, but the character's existential despair is evident. Unfortunately, the hot-and-cold dynamic of Egan's deteriorating marriage in director/screenwriter Niccol's script undercuts Hawke's performance because you never quite know where the relationship is going. Hawke's loose (and all too brief) interactions with the actors playing his young children are in some ways more revealing than his dramatic scenes with his wife (a slightly washed-out Jones), maybe because Boyhood demonstrated his capacity as a great dad and the compassion he brings to the role of parent. Perhaps the film's most

telling moments, however, are wordless ones in which no actor appears. They're the bird'seye views of American tableaux – suburban tract houses, elementary schools, interstate highways - that mimic similar sky-high perspectives just before a drone fires its missile. Are these images harbingers of things to come? It's downright chilling to think they might be.

INSIDIOUS: CHAPTER 3

D: Leigh Whannell; with Whannell, Dermot Mulroney, Stefanie Scott, Lin Shaye, Angus Sampson, Tate Berney. (PG-13, 97 min.)

This third entry in James Wan's horror franchise is a prequel rather than a sequel, and this time Wan turns over the directing chores to the series' screenwriter Leigh Whannell, who also scripted the Saw movies. Whannell must be running out of ideas for new frights, since Insidious: Chapter 3 only lavs claim to its horror bona fides with some sudden shock scares. But where the film really slacks off is in its character portrayals, creating a constellation of players about whose outcomes we care very little.

Insidious: Chapter 3 takes place prior to the haunting of the Lambert family, whose tribulations provided material for the first two films. Chapter 3 tells the story of how Elise Rainier (Shaye), the psychic who helped the Lamberts, began practicing her trade again after a demon threatened her life and scared her away from using her gift. Elise drops her trepidation when teenage Quinn Brenner (Scott) seeks her out for help contacting her dead mother. The experience introduces Elise to a couple of ghostbusters, Tucker (Sampson) and Specs (Whannell), and the three go into business together - which is how they factor into the Lamberts' lives in the two later-set films.

One thing this movie does right is to cast Lin Shaye in a starring role. Credited with supporting roles in nearly 200 movies and TV shows, the incredibly game actress is best known for some of her most outré roles. Unafraid of appearing unattractive, Shaye often steals scenes while coated with layers of unflattering makeup and bodily derangements (see her landlady in Kingpin or her dog-kissing neighbor in There's Something About Mary). So watching her stare down demons while wearing an old-lady blue cardigan is a special treat. Add to that Stefanie Scott's motherless Quinn, who puts the action into motion, and you have a horror movie with two strong female leads - no small thing.

The movie, however, has little else going for it. Quinn's family - sad dad Sean (Mulroney) and annoying little brother Alex (Berney) - demonstrate few other character traits, making them a pallid protective circle. Fans of the first two films will enjoy witnessing the initial hook-up of Elise and the ghostbusters as business partners. But there's little else here to capture a viewer's interest: It's mostly a waiting game for the next inevitable spook to go bump in the night.

The Life and Death of Colonel Blimp

D: Michael Powell and Emeric Pressburger; with Roger Livesey, Deborah Kerr, Anton Walbrook. (1943, NR, 163 min.) The Archers: Powell & Pressburger. This superb film chronicles the life and times of a staunch for-king-and-country British soldier. @Alamo Ritz, Saturday & Sunday, 2pm.



LIVE FROM NEW YORK! D: Bao Nguyen. (NR, 82 min.)

Size matters. For proof, look no further than the cinematic graveyard of Saturday Night Live skits, those five-minute bits of comic perfection, stretched to their death at feature-length. Size matters, too, in Live From New York!, a portrait of SNL at 40, but in inverse: 82 minutes isn't nearly long enough to consider every angle - or even many angles - of a cultural institution.

First-time filmmaker Bao Nguyen opens this documentary survey with "The Revolution Will Not Be Televised," a strong song selection to score a montage of Saturday Night Live archival footage clocking its growth from avant-garde to establishment, and interspersed with images from matching eras (like Monica Lewinsky, Columbine, and the grubby, pre-Giuliani New York). You might read the opening as a statement of purpose - that Nguyen is most invested in the show as a monolith: the sum, not its parts. But what is Saturday Night Live without its parts, that rowdy mélange of personalities (and so many of them self-destructive)? When Gil Scott-Heron raps that "the revolution will not go better with Coke," it rings like a homonymic call-out to all the brilliant, idiosyncratic, powder-nosed comics who turned TV comedy upside down and shook it for loose change. Most of them aren't even named here.

But a lot of the cast, along with limited crew and a grab bag of other talking heads (Brian Williams, Adam Horovitz, Bill O'Reilly), do sit for the camera. They deliver insightful, clubby, frequently funny sound bites about SNL's role as a cultural mirror and occasional conversation starter – a specific scope that excludes any exploration of the writers' room. the grueling production cycle, how the talent is culled (or cut), the live band, and about a million other avenues of exploration. What the film does do is cycle through the departure and return of producer Lorne Michaels; two of the show's longstanding problem spots: the lack of female and minority representation; the Andrew Dice Clay and Sinead O'Connor dustups; the political humor that's been whetstoned in later years; the show's role in the post-9/11 healing process; and its share-this surge in the Internet age. It's not uninteresting stuff. It's just not the whole story.

SUNSHINE SUPERMAN

D: Marah Strauch. (PG, 100 min.)

Regarded as the father of BASE jumping. Carl Boenish was a man whose knowledge, enthusiasm, and boundless energy make him an ideal and engaging subject in Marah Strauch's documentary Sunshine Superman. Working as an electrical engineer for Hughes Aircraft in the late Sixties, Boenish's hobby of parachuting out of airplanes led him to oversee the aerial photography on John Frankenheimer's 1969 film The Gypsy Moths. That was all it took for Boenish to follow his dream full time, strapping cameras on his friends and himself, making short films of beautiful and breathtaking daredevilry.

The film portrays Boenish as an iconoclast with an almost childlike fascination with the world around him. Believing that the laws of nature supersede the laws of man, Boenish and his cadre of enthusiasts started jumping off El Capitan (a towering granite monolith in Yosemite National Park that you may recall from Ansel Adams' photographs) at first surreptitiously, and then with the park rangers' blessing, and then again in secret when the jump started to become more popular. That led Boenish and co. to seek other structures to jump from - skyscrapers, bridges, inside the Houston Astrodome - leading to the creation of BASE jumping (an acronym signifying building, antenna, span, and Earth). Since Boenish always had the camera rolling, Strauch has no shortage of beautiful (and vertigo-inducing) footage of people in primarycolored jumpsuits happily leaping off of various high-altitude objects, but she anchors the film with the presence of Boenish's wife, Jean. Fiercely intelligent, and seemingly the vin to her husband's vang. Jean had no qualms jumping out of an airplane during their courtship, and eloquently describes the ups and downs (no pun, I swear) of a relationship with a man driven by documenting the euphoria of the pure freedom of gravity and inspiring people that anything is possible, a journey she eagerly embraced. A couple of keystrokes will inform you of the tragic third act to Carl Boenish's life, but I won't dwell on it here, as it's worth hearing from the people who lived it.

Sunshine Superman is at times a bit too reverent with the material, and there are distracting reenactments (à la The Jinx and Man on Wire), some of which seem extraneous, but overall, the film is a sun-kissed tribute to a singular individual. Carl Boenish embodied the spirit of a rebel, teacher, and trailblazer, whose passion and drive are reminiscent of a cross between Chuck Yeager and Timothy Leary. Climb up, suit on, jump off.

THE AGE OF ADALINE

D: Lee Toland Krieger; with Blake Lively, Michiel Huisman, Harrison Ford, Ellen Burstyn, Amanda Crew. (PG-13, 110 min.)

Many of us like to think that true love is timeless, but the notion is rarely flipped on its head. If you couldn't age, would you still be willing to watch your loved ones wither away over and over again? That's only part of the dilemma facing Adaline Bowman (Lively) in The Age of Adaline. Born in 1908 - and living a normal enough life until a freak accident causes her to die, come back, and henceforth remain immune to the ravages of time - Adaline opts to become a career fugitive, renewing her identity and general emotional detachment every decade. On the surface, Age is a low-stakes, high-concept romance, gifted with warm cinematography and lush period trappings but director Lee Toland Krieger maintains a nimble grasp on the story's sense of magic realism, elevating this love story about the weight of time passing us by above recent Sparksian competition. ALOHA

With the utterly unexceptional Aloha, Cameron Crowe so misses the mark you might conclude he's simply lost his mojo. Focused on an ethically challenged private defense contractor (Cooper) who returns to the Big Island to smooth the way for a suspicious satellite launch and to tangle and untangle two romantic interests (Stone and McAdams) along the way, the movie is little more than a series of pseudo-lyrical moments strung together at the expense of a coherently plotted path. The basic narrative problem here is that there's more backstory than story, and the entire movie has a creepy aura of selfconsciousness. In addition to the myriad definitions of aloha - affection, peace, compassion, and mercy, to name a few - the word also doubles as a coming-and-going greeting in the Hawaiian vernacular. AVENGERS: AGE OF ULTRON

When arms dealer-turned-do-gooder Tony Stark (Downey Jr.), aka Iron Man, creates an artificial intelligence designed to maintain global peace - after nar-

rowly fending off intergalactic invaders in 2012's The Avengers, along with hammer-wielding Thor (Hemsworth), super-soldier Captain America (Evans), assassin Black Widow (Johansson), rage-prone Hulk (Ruffalo), and ace archer Hawkeve (Renner) - said A.I. quickly determines that nothing could protect the human race quite like an extinction-level reset. Sounds like a bunch of nonsense. huh? To its credit, Avengers: Age of Ultron is impressively orchestrated nonsense. A mostly coherent assembly of globe-trotting, gadgets, and glib one-liners - as swell as it is swollen - writer/director Joss Whedon's sequel operates on a larger scale while retaining the same planet-saving stakes, with mortality hardly ever more than an inconvenience. Ultron may never muster any real sense of novelty to rival its billion-dollar predecessor, but, ultimately, it's a hearty helping of fine. (05/01/2015)

THE CONNECTION

D: Cédric Jimenez; with Jean Dujardin, Gilles Lellouche, Mélanie Doutey, Céline Sallette, Georges Neri. (R, 135 min., subtitled)

A Gallic companion piece to William Friedkin's seminal 1971 film. The French Connection, The Connection offers up the French side of the coin/franc in its telling of one of the most lucrative and longstanding drug trafficking operations of the last century: morphine shipped from Turkey to Marseille, where it was manufactured into heroin, and then shipped off to the U.S. for distribution. The film documents the dismantling of that trade route, centering on Marseille magistrate Pierre Michel (Dujardin) and his efforts to stop crime syndicate boss "Tany" Zampa (Lellouche) and his associates against the scenic backdrop of the French port city in the mid-Seventies. Say it isn't so, Studio Ghibli! Scuttlebutt has it that this clever, albeit notably less than thrilling, adaptation of Brit author Joan G. Robinson's 1967 YA novel may be the final feature release from the storied Japanese animation powerhouse - not surprising, following iconic studio figurehead Hayao Miyazaki's retirement in 2013, but still a loss to Japanimation fans and lovers of rich, passionate cinema the world over. When Marnie's tomboyish protagonist Anna is sent by her foster "auntie" to the rural marshlands of Hokkaido, her full, tragic backstory begins to emerge - thanks to the titular young blond girl who only seems to appear when Anna dozes off. Shot in a lovely, Ghibli-esque style, but suffering from dreadfully slow pacing and a "shocking" final revelation that will only surprise audience members under the age of one, When Marnie Was There is, disappointingly, a long way from being a Studio Ghibli classic. PLAYBACK

James Petralli's **Constant Bop**

For James Petralli, whose fleet-fingered fretwork, eclectic songwriting, and soulful singing stitches a popular local fabric known as White Denim, creative juices overflow. His garage-prog gang has stacked a commendable six LPs and four EPs since 2007. Despite that tireless rate of production, the frontman found time for a side project, Bop English, which debuted in April with the astonishingly good LP Constant Bop.

"It started in 2009 with a few tracks that White Denim didn't have time to address," explains Petralli, who cut together the album piece by piece, recording the lion's share of guitar, keyboards, and vocals with help from former Shearwater bassist

Kevin Schneider, guitar extraordinaire Adrian Quesada, and White Denim timekeeper Josh Block. "The process was pretty similar to White Denim: I write tunes, shape them, then bring the guys in. Except when we make a White Denim record, I only use those guys."

No surprise, then, that Constant Bop resembles a White Denim album, albeit with the roller-coaster musicality downshifted in favor of sonic textures and pop-worthy melodies.

"There's a lot more room in White Denim for the chops," says Petralli. "In that way, this is more of a songwriter record. There aren't a lot of solo sections or breaks."

While Petralli bopped, two of his White Denim bandmates struck gold as talent scouts. Block and lead guitarist Austin

Jenkins discovered R&B's next big thing in Leon Bridges, and assumed the roles of producers and bandmates for the 25-yearold Ft. Worth soulman. Netting a major-label contract with Columbia Records, Bridges became an overnight sensation, so Block and Jenkins' new engagement has prompted rumors that they won't be involved in White Denim's next cycle. It's a topic Petralli addresses with reticence.

> "I don't really know. We haven't really talked about it much, to be honest," he says. "Half of the band has committed to Leon Bridges. I do like working on music with live human beings, and those guys are not in the

picture right now, so to speak. Take whatever you can from that."

Petralli reveals that he's currently writing the next White Denim album and it's "coming along nicely." As to who'll play on it, he won't say, but it stands to reason it'll include members of the Bop English live band that's been stage-testing several new White Denim tunes on its recent European tour. Personnel includes local free jazz savant Jonathan Horne on guitar, Jeff Olson on drums, White Denim bassist Steve Terebecki on keyboards, and Schneider on bass.

GIRLS GONE WILD

Austin's new Music Census recorded a gender gap among local musicians: 80% male. What are the odds, then, that last Friday there were not one, but two female-fronted acts with vaginal monikers performing? It's a real sausage party out there, so forgive me if I get excited for the possibility of taco night.

At Eastside rocker lair the Lost Well, Ryoko Minowa proved stages are superfluous, eschewing the platform to scream eyelevel at the tattooed masses. As her band Clit**Eastwood** fired off bursts of grindcore and crusty thrash, the pint-sized vocalist alternated between staccato screams and flame-thrower larynx scorches, with the mic cable wrapping her arm like a tourniquet. Playful songs like "Abortion Smoothie" make the quartet Austin's most affable ambassadors of power violence. Later at **Hotel Vegas**, skanky six-pack Sailor Poon let it all hang out.

"We've got daddy issues!" announced mega-talented drummer/singer/saxophonist Selena Poon over jangly garage scuzz.

After a segment where they laid down and sang a folk song about masturbation, Sophia Poon snatched the microphone and sang about being "Young, femme, and full of phlegm." Soon, Samantha Poon brandished hairy pits and raged, "Eat me out, buy me shoes, make me come, then please leave."

Always crude, never prude, the endlessly entertaining girl group demonstrated that righteousness isn't always a matter of words, but rather attitude.

Beatlemania Afflicts Austin

Lyndon B. Johnson never showed much interest in the Beatles, famously vetoing his daughter's pleas to invite them to the White House. Nevertheless, the Fab Four's likenesses are now plastered all over the LBJ Presidential Library for a new exhibit celebrating the Mop Tops' domination of American pop culture during the Sixties.

Among the items showcased in "Ladies and Gentlemen... The Beatles!": the bass drum used on the Ed Sullivan Show, Beatle suits worn at Shea Stadium and in the Abbey Road LP photo, John Lennon's circular specs, plus merchandising mindblowers like Ringo rings, edible Beatles records, and some very creepy dolls.

The traveling collection is curated by the **Grammy Museum** and **Fab Four Exhibits**, one of whose contingent, UT grad Mark Naboshek, began his Beatles hoarding at bygone ATX record store Inner Sanctum. The local installation features a unique marvel: the first public appearance of Lennon's favored jumbo Gibson acoustic. The guitar disappeared in 1963 and remained M.I.A. until last year when an American Vietnam vet, John McCaw, discovered that the J-160E he'd bought in the late Sixties was Lennon's lost axe.

The Beatles' display launches Saturday with a free party, 9am-5pm, that'll feature performances by local equivalent the **Eggmen**, and will remain on view into 2016 – although Lennon's guitar gets hauled away June 29.

COTA'S MEGA STAGE

Circuit of the Americas debuted a new concert layout over the weekend as it hosted X Games headliners Nicki Minaj and Metallica, who twerked and head-banged, respectively, on the massive stage facing a viewing area equipped to hold up to 50,000 attendees. (See "Live Shots," p.62, for more on both acts.)

The "superstage" was conceived a year ago after 2014 X Games performer Kanye West maxed out COTA's 14,000 capacity amphitheatre. Utilizing a plot of green space near the racetrack's 11th turn, event planners constructed a gradient to maximize sight lines on the expansive lawn. There are major implications for the new live music digs: it'll allow COTA to host bands that draw over 14,000 people and offer a new space for Austin's booming music festival market.

"It's made to have a music festival," says COTA co-founder Bobby Epstein, while inspecting an aerial photo of the grounds and showing how it's designed to fit three stages. "And we can camp more people than Woodstock out here.'

Indeed, the owner of at least one large Austin music festival was on hand this weekend to scope out the grounds as a possible relocation. It's Epstein's hope that COTA will be thought of as an entertainment complex and people will stop referring to it as "the racetrack."





Heartless Bastards oracle Erika Wennerstrom confronts the moment

Erika Wennerstrom is still processing exactly what happened in the Amazon. She tries to express revelations the ayahuasca retreat opened for her, but it comes out in broken pieces as she attempts to hold back tears. Maybe it's still too soon.

Maybe it can't be put into words.

In April, with the Heartless Bastards' new LP finally finished and the local quartet's extensive tour ahead, Wennerstrom flew to Peru alone for two weeks. From Iquitos, she followed a shaman into the jungle and drank thick brown ayahuasca tea. Visions induced by the hallucinogenic root are said to be both enlightening and terrifying.

"I was at just such a low point, I thought it might be eye-opening," recalls the singer. "I was like, what do I have to fear? The massive stress and being so hard on myself writing the album, it was a lot. There was a point where I had to start looking at things different. There has to be a different way to do this. There has to be a way to alleviate that.

"Is it possible to silence that negative voice in your head?"

Sitting with bandmates Jesse Ebaugh and Mark Nathan on the secluded upstairs terrace of Hotel Saint Cecilia overlooking Austin, Wennerstrom wipes the tears from her cheek.

"I'm so emotional," she apologizes with a laugh. "I'm starting to not care about crying so much. I used to be embarrassed, and maybe I still am, but it's okay."

Such openness and vulnerability admits a new philosophy and mindset for the songwriter, who turns 38 this week. As with 2012's exceptional fourth album, Arrow, the Heartless Bastards' new Restless Ones throbs with a palpable impulse of searching. Whereas the previous disc stretched yearningly, like an all-night desert road trip, Restless Ones turns inward. It's less a seeking of something or somewhere in the distance, than a need to understand the present and appreciate it.

For Wennerstrom, the path led her to South America.

"I do think that the trip - and though I wouldn't necessarily attribute it to ayahuasca - but I think I came out of it with more of an understanding of myself," she acknowledges. "I felt that in my life, there are these parts of me that live in fear - fear of failure, fear of success, fear of love, fear of loneliness.

"Sometimes it can just leave you inactive, or make you feel idle," she sighs. "I've been trying to understand. Writing is just so difficult, and I give myself such a hard time about it, that I think there's got to be a way that I can continue to do this and not do that to myself. Why do I do that? In a lot of different ways, and not just in a career sense, I think sometimes I forget to stop and be present."

"I had spun out and filled myself with doubt. I was standing in the doorway with the key to my own suffering, and I said to myself, 'There's no use trying to be what you want me to be."

When Wennerstrom moved to Austin from Cincinnati in 2007, it represented a new start. Her 10-year relationship with Mike Lamping, who joined Heartless Bastards shortly after its founding in 2002, had dissolved, and with it the band that had gained traction behind two albums of powerfully ripped blues-rock.

Even as she recruited unfamiliar session players with producer Mike McCarthy to record 2009's The Mountain, Wennerstrom determined to keep the band name rather than start over. She eventually reconnected with founding drummer Dave Colvin, who was attending graduate school at UT and now lives in Pittsburgh, then recruited bassist Ebaugh to move south from Kentucky. Nathan, who worked sound for the trio on tour, soon joined as second gui-

tarist, solidifying the band's sound (see "I Could Be So Happy," Jan. 30, 2009).

The core of Heartless Bastards remained its frontwoman's distinctive, emotive vocals. Wennerstrom's Midwestern drawl settles in a low, throaty roar against a rumble of guitars and wails as the songs climb to crescendo.

"When I write something, I'll already have the melody, so I'll sing a lot of vowel and consonant sounds," she explains. "It almost feels like the emotion that comes to me is like a primal scream, and I'm not sure where that comes from sometimes. But I feel like when I finally force that thought into words and push it out there, it's very

"Performing live, it's different. There's something very comforting and calming about it, even if what brought it on was from an emotional place. When I'm singing with emotion, generally I find it calming."

Wennerstrom's compositions thrive in that surge of feelings, whether the defiant rawness of The Mountain or the longing that courses through Arrow. Likewise, her lyrics draw from a deeply personal wellspring, contributing to both the intimacy and anxiety that each song brings.

"Writing an album, it's just a lot of time in my head," she admits. "They get more challenging each time, and because they're very much me, I'm trying to find new ways to say things.

"Sometimes songs have multiple meanings, even for me. Sometimes I look back on lyrics, like for [Restless Ones opener] 'Wind Up Bird.' Some parts of that song were initially about a situation with someone else, but then part of me thinks I've lied to

HEARTLESS BASTARDS Restless Ones (Partisan)

Restless Ones continues the Heartless Bastards' quest never to repeat themselves. Arrow in 2012 expanded the Austinites' reach and reputation with rock hard grooves, departing from introspective nature and country influences on 2009's The Mountain. The psychedelic blues overload of Restless Ones opener "Wind Up Bird" immediately sets the band's fifth LP on a new path. Readily apparent is the fact that frontwoman Erika Wennerstrom's songwriting has reached another peak. Nodding to the vinyl version, the disc breaks



into two halves. Defiance and glam hooks line "Black Cloud" early on, but the five songs of Side B find the Heartless Bastards at their most incisive. There's the bracing "Into the Light," on which Wennerstrom brings to mind another Ohio native, Chrissie Hynde. The breezy guitars and pleading nature of "The Fool" firmly juxtapose the heaviness echoed all over "Eastern Wind." Ending with the breathing pulse of closer "Tristessa," its title taken from a Jack Kerouac novella, haunts appropriately restless. The combination of Wennerstrom's singular vocal style and the Bastards' multilayered guitars remains both lyrically commanding and musically transcendent.

myself. Even 'Black Cloud,' it's like I'm that person I'm trying to please, but I just can't.

"I'm just really hard on myself."

As Wennerstrom's voice begins to falter in articulating her struggles with songwriting, her bandmates pick up the thread.

"I feel that you've been developing this visual language of images that you return to, like primary colors a painter would use, and I think that process is really beginning to mature," offers Ebaugh. "These images like home or sun recur a lot, and they can mean different things depending on the context and how they're fit together. It's a maturation of that poetic process to channel emotion."

"Lyrically, you may have struggled at times, but with your voice, you could track those vowels and consonant sounds with no lyrics and still be emotive," adds Nathan to his co-guitarist. "That's one thing that comes very naturally. It's immediate and powerful, because your voice is very unique. It hits you in the gut."

Fear, anxiety, the constant self-critical admonitions and paralyzing apprehensions – more than any other Heartless Bastards album, *Restless Ones* confronts those emotions for Wennerstrom. Simply expressing

those feelings brought relief to their owner, but more importantly, she drew strength from understanding them and pushing beyond their constrictions.

"There's a Dan Eldon book, *The Journey Is the Destination*," she says. "I love that book, but I also think that so much is said just in that title. It's a sense of being grateful and more present. Having that realization – an ongoing process – I felt sort of a new dawn approaching. A different outlook on life.

"Writing this record, part of me let things go that I've carried [a long time]," she continues. "Gates of Dawn' represents a stepping outside of it, and past it. It sort of leaves off from [Arrow], from searching to realizing that you don't really need to get from point A to point B to appreciate where you're at and being in that moment.

"That's really what it's all about for me, both professionally and personally."

That emphasis on immediacy extended to production of the album as well, with John Congleton leading the recording sessions in the expansive isolation of Sonic Ranch studios outside of El Paso. Congleton (St. Vincent, Okkervil River, Sigur Rós) embraced spontaneity, given that the songs hadn't been fleshed out live. Together, he and the foursome captured unexpected moments that seed *Restless Ones* with a sense of serendipity and suspense.

"When I write, it's me trying to write where I want to go and not just where I am," muses Wennerstrom. "In a sense, the writing's a reminder to myself to adopt that, kind of hoping to pick that up. And singing that over and over again is like a guide to take that thought into practice.

"I've been very guarded in the past," she admits. "Because I'm a very emotional person. That's just who I am. I would hold back, because I'd be embarrassed by that. But I feel like it's good to not do that. I think it's made me more open."

Purging the voice of doubt remains a struggle for Wennerstrom, but onstage – in the pocket of the moment – it's silenced with the calm of emotion pouring out mantras intoned above the roar of guitars.



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X GAMES: NICKI MINAJ Circuit of the Americas, June 5

Don't take the mainstreaming of Nicki Minaj for granted. At 32, half a decade into stardom, she's proudly, calmly co-headlining an ESPN event with Metallica. Women in hiphop have had success, but neither Lil' Kim nor Salt-N-Pepa ever reached these masses. Sex symbol, feminist, rapper, she arrives via elevator to her muddy X Games set in a checkerboard top flanked by two engineers. "All Things Go" opens last year's defining third album, The Pinkprint, and thus begins her performance. How well does the general public know this non-radio, non-single version of Minaj? The one that raps, "Ten years ago, that's when you proposed/ I look down, 'Yes I suppose." Beyond the truffle butter, she cut one of the most heart-wrenching breakup albums ever, yet on a racetrack it's easier to tear the house down with "Only" and "Anaconda." That's fine too. Minaj assumes full fire-breather mode, so the first half of her 90-minute set is entirely dedicated to the nastiest blacked-out verses in her catalog. After a short break she returns with the fluorescent pop that helped get her over to middle America: "Super Bass," "Pound the Alarm," megahit "Starships." It's the part of the show where Minaj sings (or at least hides behind overdubs) instead of raps. Will she always be caught in this "one for them, one for me" middle ground? She's hip-hop at heart, but these dizzy rave bangers were created to appease executives instead of her own. creative inclinations. Whatever. If Nicki Minaj needs to sing hooks to get her message out, then maybe it's a necessary evil. She tells us never to depend on a man for anything, and exits to the next battleground. - Luke Winkie

X GAMES: METALLICA Circuit of the Americas, June 6

Metallica could be forgiven for simply collecting the paycheck at a gig with an inadequate sound mix, onstage contest winners, and a sprawling outdoor audience for an event where



music isn't even the focus. As the Bay Area metal squad proved during its headlining X Games appearance, however, they're not just any band. Following Ennio Morricone's "The Ecstasy of Gold," the quartet came out swinging with "Fuel," stripped of its Nineties alt-rock trappings and given a speed-metal overhaul. That branded the next 100 minutes: an old-fashioned thrashing at the hands of the genre's pioneer. Only five songs hailed from the last 27 years of Metallica's career, while the other nine roared out of its 1983-86 heyday. It bespeaks the group's influence that raging blasters "For Whom the Bell Tolls," "Battery," and "Master of Puppets," plus the misery-soaked trilogy "Fade to Black," "Welcome Home (Sanitarium)," and "One," now stand as crowd sing-alongs. Black Album standouts "Sad but True" and set-closer "Enter Sandman" may not be thrash classics, but they still pound. Even "Cyanide," included only to note that the band put out an album in the last decade, fit the vibe. They saved their most spine-snapping savagery for last, with a three-song, shout-along encore of "Creeping Death," "Whiplash," and "Seek & Destroy." Frontman James Hetfield couldn't keep a joyful grin off his face. Despite three decades of playing such physically punishing music, the aging foursome performed with the same gleeful fury as it did when the songs were new.





THE ROLLING STONES AT&T Stadium, Arlington, June 6

Catching his breath after a knotty, harp-driven "Midnight Rambler" late in a two-hour main set, Mick Jagger cited the Rolling Stones' first performance in Texas. "San Antonio, 1964," nodded the 71-year-old sprinter. "A hamburger and autograph party at the state fair." Saturday in Arlington - inside a stadium deserving its own post office on the 15-date North American Zip Code tour - sex, drugs, and rock & roll's original poster boys kept their halfcentury pledge to the Lone Star State. As on the night the band mowed down Zilker Park in 2006, they tipped a (cowboy) hat to Texans, admired their surroundings, and rolled a seven. From 1969-82, the Beatles' onetime counterparts hit the long and winding road nearly every year, a pace that after their own cold war of the Eighties, slowed to every three-plus years until the A Bigger Bang tour rolled through Austin and concluded in Europe 10 months later. Following Keith Richards' bestselling autobiography, Life, which savaged Jagger, another détente between the singer/guitarist band axis appeared distant until, almost as an afterthought, the band marked its 50th anniversary in 2012 with a pair of surprise shows in Paris. Since then, two tours totaling 59 shows only got as far south as Chicago. Fourth stand of this blitzkrieg (Gary Clark Jr. opened the kickoff in San Diego last month), and sole concert in the Republic, this corker made good. Sticky Fingers' new reissue dusted off "Moonlight Mile" a quarter of the way in, its opium-den shivers flashing back to the menace of 1971. Every hit in its wake – and the 19-song set list played out as basic in its staples as any time in the band's history – only dug its heels in deeper. Introducing his customary two-song set midway through, Richards, 71, started by shouting out his longtime partner in crime, late Lubbock sax stud Bobby Keys, who debuted with the Stones on Sticky Fingers and shared the same birthday as Keith. "I swear he can hear that," grinned the guitarist at the response. Richards' leads during "Sympathy for the Devil" had obviously pledged fealty to the darker arts given their sulphuric sting, while partner in six-string sympathy Ronnie Wood, 68, all-out assaulted "Midnight Rambler." Sir Charlie Watts (should be, anyway), 74, the most underrated drummer in all rock & roll, drove the entire juggernaut like the gold coast slaver of "Brown Sugar," whose Keys solo was reborn in Karl Denson's saber-toothed sax. When Watts pounded his kit to finish "Tumbling Dice," even the home of the Dallas Cowboys shook. Lisa Fischer, appearing locally at the One World Theatre on August 8, tore "Gimme Shelter" a new shriek as she has since 1989, Richards at one point crouched in front of her grinning maniacally. Boyish ("Miss You"), playful ("Let's Spend the Night Together"), sincere (a snippet of "All My Ex's Live in Texas"), the Rolling Stones were downright endearing. If they've lost a step, they've accrued untold humanity. - Raoul Hernandez



TYLER, THE CREATOR Emo's, June 6

The great news for Emo's was: no riot. Not that Tyler, the Creator's performance precluded belligerence from fans young and old. In a scant few years of notoriety, the L.A. rapper has proved a definitive test of wideranging audience demographics, cartoonishly wanton violence, and modern child-rearing. Not surprisingly, then, some attendees needed a babysitter and Wet Nap for the Cheetos stains. "What's up, Austin? Motherfuckers!" barked the 24-year-old MC, and once addressed, you couldn't turn away. Tyler's magnetism locks crowds into a disturbingly palpable brand of horrorcore trap. Warming up with "Bitch Suck Dick," the turnt-up mob obliged Tyler's "no fucks given" approach, fully compliant to the rapper's demands. "Every time I jump, I feel like I'm about to die. But fuck it, I like you guys," explained a foggy Tyler, who's disclosed that his condition required a doctor's visit. When not taking deep drags from an inhaler and launching open water bottles into the crowd, Tyler proved a seasoned comic of sorts. In one exchange, he made a lucky, fair-skinned fan's day, informing him, "You can suck my nut sack, nigger!" Turning toward the rest, he hole-punches the climax: "By the way, that's a white male." For neophytes, there isn't exactly a guidebook, unless your frame of reference includes agitprop punk and industrial, which he demonstrated on rousing closer "Cherry Bomb." As he says on "Deathcamp," a mantra of sorts: "I don't like to follow the rules; I hope you understand." - Kahron Spearman

"I don't think any of us foresaw this happening, either," shrugs Larry Parypa, 69-yearold guitarist for Tacoma, Washington's reactivated garage-punk kings the Sonics. "All this time, I didn't realize what was going on. I just got up in the morning and went to work [in insurance]. I didn't know there was anything happening, musically."

What happened was five teenage roughnecks steered the R&B-driven sound of Sixties Northwest rock & roll toward their own crude blast-and-bash by dint of what Parypa snorts was a "sheer lack of talent." Even local scene godheads the Wailers eventually issued recordings emulating the pre-punk barbarism of Sonics classics like "He's Waiting" and "Strychnine." Fueling the mayhem were Parypa's chainsaw guitar and singer Jerry Roslie's throat-shredding scream and off-kilter lyricism.

"He's the most shy person I've ever known in my life," says Parypa of the enigmatic

singer. "He still is! He has a real hard time [performing]. But somehow, he must let it out through the lyrics he sings. For example, I don't know where he came up with injecting strychnine! Who the hell would do that?!"

After several TV ads licensed the band's version of "Have Love, Will Travel," the Sonics returned from death by Vietnam, psychedelia, and the workaday world in 2007. Years spent playing to large crowds never

seen on the teen dance circuit bolstered their confidence enough to cut March's shockingly potent This Is the Sonics, their first studio LP in 50 years.

Parypa was amused by producer Jim Diamond's unique advice.

"He kept telling me to play like a 16-year-old," he chuckles. "But we didn't have to reinvent ourselves or dumb ourselves down, in terms of how we approached music. We didn't have to try to play like we used to. That's just how we play!"

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
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
Dear Luv Doc.





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
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
