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


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

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## Snatching Defeat From the Jaws of Victory

This column was going to be part of a twostep with last week's, spelling out in some detail why I so passionately support Bernie Sanders for president. This includes that his utopian economic fantasies are far more achievable and admirable than critics insist. But especially that the Sanders candidacy is a reinvigorating political new wind, reminding us that the best part of this country is about dreaming of a greater future for all citizens, where the standards are not personal wealth, tribal racism, and parochial, petty nationalism. The best idea of America is a melting pot. A melting pot of people. ideas, beliefs, customs, and cultures where the drive toward social, economic, racial, and sexual identity justice is an admirable goal deeply rooted in the Founding Fathers' formative vision. As Americans we have a moral, philosophical, and ideological obligation to strive for a better, more equitable world. This drive is neither secretly fascistic communism or toward a modern politically correct repressive inquisition, but is a noble quest tied deeply to the vision that gave our nation birth.

It was going to begin by suggesting that even those long cognizant of the duplicitous nature of American politics can still allow for galvanizing moments. Recalling an old Doonesbury where Mark, riding with striking truckers, alerts his friends to dig out gas masks and riot helmets from the bottom drawers where they had long languished because the revolution is alive, I was going to echo the call that it was time again for the old left to rise. To courageously blast away the blasé, hardened feelings built up by too many decades of watching real-world politics. That once more it was time for those now settled and secure to recall the sweet air of optimistic possibility and passionate belief. Even if this people's campaign did

not lead to Bernie Sanders getting nominated or winning the election, this beat-up old democratic republic of ours could stand the infusion of common and shared decency. Thomas Jefferson said, "The tree of liberty must be refreshed from time to time with the blood of patriots and tyrants." I've always taken that as more a metaphoric statement, even when my more lunatic friends, especially decades back, took it as a prescription for real revolutionary violence. We all saw how that worked out. The acceptance of violence as a political tool has rarely favored liberation, but far more often reactionary repression.



But that column stalled because increasingly the "if my candidate is right your candidate is not only wrong but evil and corrupt" strategies that are infecting these campaigns suggested that any kind of partisan championing, no matter how wellintentioned, inherently became part of this destructive political psychosis.

Does anyone really care that Hillary Clinton was once a pro-Goldwater Republican? Better put, outside of using any bullet in an increasingly destructive civil war, does anybody genuinely believe that somehow taints her lifelong political involvement in this country? Let me come clean: When I was 12 and 13 I very foolishly supported the war in Vietnam, championing it as a necessary international intervention by the United States. Having read most of the deeply anti-Communist books of Dr. Tom Dooley, I believed that invasion was not just necessary but morally correct. If that taints the hundreds of political columns I've written over the past three decades, then they are so stained.

More and more the vicious teardowns being conducted by supporters of the two Democratic presidential candidates against their opponent are spiraling out of control. During SXSW, our good friend Fab Five Freddy visiting from NYC suggested that the conceptual structure of the Republican primary campaign was quite simply the World Wrestling Federation. As usual with FFF, this seemed an astonishingly simple and appropriate description. Unfortunately it now seems our Democratic family has embraced the same WWF model. Governing is not about cooperation, respect for opposing views, and the necessary compromises demanded by our constitutional-based government. It is about inane mythologizing and partisan boasting, as well as demonizing and denigrating opponents.

All around, most of the criticism claims to be rooted in ideology, but in reality are philosophical arguments being used to justify competitive sports team enthusiasms. I support Sanders. I am not a fan of Clinton. But the attacks on her are beyond reason. Innuendo becomes fact, assumption is confirmation. This is true in the other direction as well. Anyone in public life for any period of time has had to make numerous compromises. Ted Cruz may well be an exception to this - not that he is principled, but as a strategic demagogue whose drive is power rather than ideology or an actual legislative agenda, compromise is really not a tool to accomplish his goals.

Those who voted for Nader privileged their principles over the real-world consequences. This is not to taint Nader personally but to talk about the actual results of his run. I suspect few of his supporters accept blame for the tens of thousands of dead Iraqis; after all, they are halfway around the world. At the time, the argument of his supporters was, roughly, "My conscience is clearer than yours because I did not vote for the lesser of two evils. My vote was principled." Of course those dead, wounded, and orphaned in Iraq were not polled for their input.

If any progressive/liberal/what-have-you believes the Republican candidate is better than having to settle for Clinton or Sanders, I am at a loss for words. I've been watching politics for a long time. The thinking that we should let things get worse because that will instigate a mass movement in the other direction has consistently failed as a liberal policy. Unfortunately, the success of progressive agendas has mobilized conservative reactions. Making things worse serves the right more than the left. And it is a disaster for those it affects.

There is a difference between Democrats and Republicans. There are real-world responsibilities to how we vote. Voting is not a sacrosanct, egoistic act in which one's intellectual purity is the goal. It is our responsibility as citizens. We are not being asked what we think. It is not a poll. We are being asked who are the best people to lead us. If our personal choice is not a candidate, this does not remove the responsibility of the consequence of our vote. Petulant tantrums have real-world consequences.


It is not just Bernie Sanders for President, but has become Definitely Not Clinton if she is the chosen candidate. The Clintonites disdain Sanders. Until then, every attempt to drag her through the mud and destroy her is perceived as legitimate despite the likely general election consequences. But many are now arguing to sit out the election or vote for a third-party candidate. Last time we ended up with Bush. This time we could end up with Cruz or Trump. If that happens, may God forgive us because few others will.

## Everybody Loses

## UBER AND LYFT NEED MORE AND BETTER REGULATIONS, NOT FEWER

The *Chronicle*'s endorsement for the May 7 election won't come out until the April 22 issue, but you don't need a weatherman to know which way the wind blows: Most of the news staff – if not all of us – will be voting "no" on Prop. 1.

Ever since they came to Austin, Uber and Lyft have behaved as though rules were for other people. It's their business model, as far as I can tell. The referendum on City Council's fingerprinting requirement is only their latest attempt to avoid any regulation. Travis County Democratic Chair Vincent Harding, in a March

statement, put what's really at stake May 7 very clearly: "I have serious concerns that if one corporation decides it can run a campaign to write its own rules, then this will send a signal to every large corporation that if they have the budget they can go around the legislative branch of government."

When former HD 49 candidate Huey Rey Fischer announced last week that he had taken a job as a paid consultant for

Ridesharing Works for Austin, the PAC that's behind Prop. 1, I couldn't help but roll my eyes. Fischer has endeavored to reframe the debate about TNCs less as a progressive vs. libertarian debate and more as a young vs. old. I can see his point, inasmuch as it smacks of youthful naivete to me to think that Uber and Lyft know how best to regulate themselves.

However, we have to acknowledge that the reason TNCs succeeded so quickly is because Austin's other transportation options are so terrible. Driving is fine as long as you're not doing it during rushhour traffic, which is getting perilously close to being an all-day phenomenon. If you're lucky enough to live within walking distance of one of Cap Metro's better routes, the bus can be an okay option. But there are many places in Austin where the service isn't accessible without either a prohibitively long walk or a ride to the bus stop, and where taking the bus means going out of your way and making multiple connections. And the lack of late-night routes is a real problem for those who work late. Riding a bike or walking can be treacherous, given the lack of consistent sidewalks and bike lanes. Austin's taxi system has never made any sense, nor has it been regulated in a way that ensures drivers are able to make a living wage.

So if you're a consumer who has a smartphone and a debit card, Uber and Lyft don't seem so bad in comparison. If you're struggling to make it in Austin, being able to pick CONTINUED ON **P.12**

up a few hours driving is pretty attractive as well. But choosing to drive for them isn't the same as okaying the fact that they're playing fast and loose with long-established labor protections by refusing to acknowledge that their drivers actually work *for* them. And using them to pick you up when you've had too much to drink doesn't require you to defend their refusal to fully vet the people you're trusting to get you home safe.

It's unfortunate, then, as bullying and exploitative as Uber and Lyft are, the ordinance they're fighting isn't that great, either. Requiring TNCs to fingerprint their drivers is a reasonable request, but it doesn't do enough to ensure passenger safety. It doesn't require that drivers receive any additional training. It doesn't require that they pass any sort of additional driving test (and I think anyone who's experienced Austin traffic can attest that many licensed drivers are also terrible drivers), or that they meet with anyone from their company's HR department to make sure they're the type of person you'd want to be stuck in a car with. And importantly, it doesn't do anything to protect the rights of drivers as workers. Instead, it focuses on the idea of a criminal record as a measure of a person's suitability for the job.

Today, April 7, Council will consider an ordinance that defines exactly how those criminal records should be considered. Rather than merely being not great, this new ordinance is bad. It lists which types of convictions disqualify potential drivers for both cab companies and TNCs. It's quite the list. It seems sensible enough to say that a DUI or a rape conviction should be taken into account when considering whether someone gets a permit. However, a drug possession conviction will get you banned for seven years, while a conviction for selling will get you banned for life. Resisting arrest is another charge that carries a lifetime ban. These blanket bans are completely at odds with Council's recently passed fair chance hiring ordinance.

The bans reinforce the very stigmas that the fair chance law is designed to counteract. They make it more difficult to find work for people who have served their time for a wide variety of crimes (21 offenses are listed). They will have the effect of discriminating against minorities, because minorities are disproportionately charged and sentenced for drug crimes. (When asked for comment, a representative from Mobility Committee Chair Ann Kitchen's office directed me to the Austin Transportation Department, which was unable to get back to me before press time. Fair chance ordinance sponsor Greg Casar said that he plans to request that the draft be sent back to staff, so that they can "make it better.")

I understand that it isn't fair that taxis get one set of regulations and TNCs get another. But applying bad, outdated policy to everyone isn't fair, either. Here's hoping Council doesn't do something that gives credence to Uber and Lyft's claim that they shouldn't be the ones making the rules.

## **Mobility and Affordability**

As Mayor **Steve Adler** noted recently, "No other city is better positioned than Austin to realize the potential of the **Smart City Initiative**. Moreover, no U.S. city is in more need of innovation in transportation to address our most pressing challenges of mobility and affordability."

These are certainly the buzzwords of the season and obvious targets for civic improvement. Everyone bemoans the **traffic and lack of transit**. And the **cost of living** – particularly housing – has gone through the roof. Moreover, there are tantalizing hints that solutions to both problems are synergistic: that redesigning parts of the city to put more people along mobility corridors can make it easier to get around, *and* less expensive to live. That if we can take all those cars out of the planning equation ("**sheet metal horses**," an architect friend used to call them), streets become more attractive, more

bike-and-ped-friendly, and much more compact. We can almost see the bright, shiny Austin of the future, but it's not so clear how we get from here to there, without destroying what's already here.

So, you can sit back and await the flying cars (now *auto-piloted* flying cars) that we've been promised, or you can roll up your sleeves and try to join the planning effort:

The hardest work is the ongoing slog toward a **Land Development Code** rewrite. The **CodeNEXT** team held a Public Comment Meeting this past Monday, April 4, to gather feedback on its recently released "code prescription paper," intended to give a general idea of the direction(s) the new code will take. The seven sections in the document were grouped and discussed at four different stations, four of which seemed pretty tame: **Greenfield Development; Water and Watersheds; Landscape and Trees; Parks and Open Space**. (I mean, who's against parks?)



All of the controversy seemed crammed into one station – encompassing the broad and contentious issues of: **Redevelopment**; **Compatibility and Transitions**; and **Design for Mobility**. The action around that table was so crowded, and so heated, that for a good 45 minutes, people were struggling to get close enough to hear well, let alone join the conversation, moderated gamely by the redoubtable Dave Sullivan.

Still, it may be that folks on both sides – let's call them **preservationists** and **gentrifiers**, to use terms equally unfair to both – got a chance to hear each other, and perhaps find places where there's middle ground. And perhaps city staff heard both sides as well, and will find ways to draft zoning code that will address everyone's concerns. But at this point, despite all the attempts at public outreach, that process is pretty much a black box. No one outside the CodeNEXT team has

any idea how this input will be evaluated, how the code writing and mapping will be done, or what it might look like. Get another peek inside the box this Saturday at the **Code Prescription Community Walk: Oltorf/South First streets**, April 9, 9-11am, starting from Once Over Coffee Bar, 2009 S. First.

Meanwhile, Mayor Adler's been chasing the transportation dollars. Last week he was in San Diego for a World Economic Forum meeting on urban mobility – where U.S. Department of Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx provided an update on the **Smart City Challenge**, in which Austin is one of seven finalists for a grant of up to \$50 million to implement a "transformative" mobility solution – and then headed to Washington, D.C., to further discuss the project.

Austin's proposal is based on several projects that are already under way: It imagines using "big data" to make traffic lights automatically adjust to weather, traffic flow, and accidents, as well as providing personalized, automatic traffic reports. In the preliminary round, Austin also proposed electrifying the city vehicle and taxi fleets, a pilot project for a driverless shuttle bus at the airport, and one-stop-shopping transportation hubs and mobility passes that would include bus, rail, taxis, and TNCs in one seamless package. (Those are the sorts of civic partnerships that **Google** will jump right into, while **Uber** will spurn unless forced, and therein lies the difference between a responsible corporate citizen and one that's not. But I digress.) See the preliminary proposal at www.austintexas. gov/page/smart-city-challenge.

Final proposals are due next month, with the winner to be announced in June.

Meanwhile, the city is holding a series of **Mobility Talks conversations** about transit priorities, all around town through April. They start Mon., April 11, 11am at Strange Brew, 5326 Manchaca Rd., and Tue., April 12, 12:30pm at Cafe Ruckus, 409 W. Second, and 7pm at Cafe Java, 11900 Metric.

And if code won't fix it ... The city's hosting a series of Austin Housing Plan Conversations, to get your input on Austin's affordable housing conundrum and how it might be addressed, continuing around town through April. This week's meetings are Sat., April 9, 10:30am-12:30pm at Manchaca Library, 5500 Manchaca Rd., and Mon., April 11, 6-8pm at Pleasant Hill Library, 211 E. William Cannon. www.austintexas.gov/housingplan.

Oops: I somewhat garbled some detail in last week's listing for **Texas State Parks Month** at **Whole Earth Provision Co.** stores. 
## Prop 1 Campaign Switches Into High Gear

The debate over the May 7 vote on Prop 1, concerning the regulation of transportation network companies (TNCs) like Uber and Lyft, is often framed as a partisan battle, with the Travis County Democratic Party backing the Democratic City Council members in opposing the measure.

But Huey Rey Fischer, recent Democratic candidate for House District 49, disagrees. Last week, Fischer was hired as the deputy outreach director for Ridesharing Works for Austin, the PAC behind Prop 1. And he's not alone. A handful of local Democratic consultants have joined RWA's outreach team - including Joe Bowen (who recently worked for the Texas Democratic Party and judicial nominee and former TCDP chair Jan Soifer), Patrick McDonald (who managed judicial nominee Brad Urrutia's campaign), Jovita Pardo (who managed sheriff nominee Sally Hernandez's campaign), and Pedro Villalobos (who also worked on Hernandez's campaign).

The additions come as RWA kicks its campaign into full throttle. RWA has been canvassing around UT's West Mall and at student spots like dollar beer night at Cain & Abel's in West Campus. Uber has added RWA ads onto their email receipts, and Lyft has emailed users directly, writing, "We know that ridesharing won't work here if the new rules go into effect. That's why we support Prop 1, and we hope you will. too."

"I don't think it's an ideological dichotomy," Fischer said: "The pro-ridesharing campaign spans the political spectrum." In some ways, the debate seems to be more of a generational fight than a partisan one. The 23-year-old Fischer, a 2014 UT grad and former president of University Democrats, told the Chronicle, "I see it as an issue that greatly impacts the quality of life of young people." For example, he said, "It's just convenient and it's affordable and students know it's safe."



In contrast, Vincent Harding, the chair of the Travis County Democratic Party, has no sympathy for TNCs. In a March 18 statement announcing the TCDP's opposition to Prop 1, Harding wrote that the election "is not about whether Uber should be in Austin or whether we want Uber in Austin." Instead, he said, it's about "Uber trying to write its own regulations" which Harding described as a "clear cut example of corporations exercising their power over people and their elected representatives." Also in opposition to Prop 1 is the **Our City, Our Safety, Our Choice** PAC, led by Gonzalo Barrientos, Sarah Goodfriend, Saundra Kirk, Fred and Dawn Lewis, Laura Morrison, and Joe Pinnelli. According to one of their press releases, "The fundamental issue [of Prop 1] is this: Who will run Austin, local citizens or corporate special interests?"

But Fischer disagrees with framing the issue in that way: "It's a debate on whether we're going to have regulations that truly protect consumers and drivers, or we're going to have regulations that are being pushed by taxicab companies who are desperately trying to hang on to the vestiges of whatever business they still have."

It seems like people on both sides fear that politicians are being bought: One of the reasons given for the failed attempt to recall City Council Member Ann Kitchen - who as Mobility Committee chair has led the charge for more regulations on TNCs - was a \$4,000 donation her campaign received from Lone Star Cab. TCDP Communications Director Joe Deshotel has also been working against Prop 1, arguing that the issue is similar to Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission. He wrote on Facebook, "Opposing is more about respecting the democratic process than agreeing with City Council. Companies shouldn't decide public safety rules." RWA supporters point out that Deshotel has ties to Electric Cab, but he told the Chronicle: "I don't receive compensation or salary but I'm hoping to soon if all goes well." And he said that doesn't really affect his stance on Prop 1 in any case. "They don't compete with Uber for passengers; [they] only operate within Downtown ... The more Uber and TNCs get people used to leaving their cars at home the better it is for eCab."

Regarding the addition of Fischer and other consultants to RWA, multiple sources have reported that the consultants are being paid between \$12,000 and \$15,000, with a possible win bonus. Since the PAC reports have not yet been released, that's only speculation at this point. Both Fischer and RWA declined to comment. However, Fischer did respond on Facebook to a comment accusing him of being a "Sell Out," writing, "This comment is a bit too personal." While it's almost laughable for a public figure like Fischer to act like money in politics is "a bit too personal," he clarified that "I was for Prop 1 before I joined the campaign and I sincerely support the current ordinances on the books."

Fischer told the Chronicle that Council was "very wellintentioned, but misguided" on the issue. "All these issues about public safety should be examined, and they should be examined thoughtfully and they should be taken seriously. Unfortunately, the May 7 election does not honestly deal with those issues," Fischer added.

It's not all disagreement: Both Harding and Fischer have expressed concerns about the labor issues related to TNCs. However, while "those are all valid things that should be discussed," Fischer told the Chronicle, "that's not what the May 7 ordinance is about." - Mac McCann

## **COUNCIL PREVIEW: WATER, TNCs, AND HOUSING**

In a win for social service and health advocates, City Council passed two separate Items during its March 31 meeting that direct funds to assist vulnerable populations - providing up to \$40 million for "self-sufficiency social services" through 2018, and approving a \$1,050,000 agreement with six social service agencies to provide community-based health prevention and education programs over the next year. Over Council Members Don Zimmerman and Ellen Troxclair's vocal opposition, both measures passed 8-2, with Mayor Steve Adler off the dais on city business.

Today (April 7), Council – with Adler back on the dais – will look to mitigate excess water bills, assist middle-income home-buyers, revise electronic campaign finance forms, and equalize taxi and transportation network company regulations.

Prompted by the unusual spike in some customers' water bills last summer ("Austin Water Woes," Sept. 11, 2015) Troxclair has

proposed a resolution (Item 23) to create an administrative adjustment policy for Austin Water customers who experience an unexplained increase in water and wastewater usage. If a customer sees a bill more than three times their average usage, they can submit an application within 90 days of the bill date and may be eligible for partial credit of the excess charge.

Item 17 is considered a "next step" of the TNC ordinance passed by Council in December ("Uber and Lyft Go to City Hall" Dec. 18, 2015). The measure specifies which offenses would bar both TNC drivers and ground transportation chauffeurs (i.e., taxi drivers) from operating. A person who has been convicted of certain offenses in the past seven years (including possession of a controlled substance and prostitution), or convicted of certain offenses at any point in their life (including rape and aggravated assault) is disqualified from obtaining a chauffeur's permit and from driving for a TNC. It also stops drivers



from continuing business if they are charged with or arrested for any of the listed offenses. It requires both types of drivers to submit a complete driving record and nationwide criminal history within 30 days of submitting their application for a chauffeur's permit.

Expect Zimmerman to pick a fight over Item 24, a resolution drafted by CM Delia Garza that looks to help out the "missing **middle**" – potential housing buyers who aren't eligible for government subsidies but can't afford market-rate housing. Garza asks the city manager to examine how the city


could use part of the unallocated 2013

affordable housing bond funds (which now mainly go toward rental units and home repair) for affordable housing geared toward residents at or below 80% of the MFI. (During the Tuesday work session, co-sponsor Greg Casar made the point that our affordability crisis is such that Council must now find ways to subsidize housing for middleincome residents.) The ordinance also proposes creating a working group to come up with ways (zoning changes; future CodeNEXT regs; etc.) to assist that bracket of homebuyers. A major opponent of the city's recent affordable housing bond packages, Zimmerman accused the resolution of promoting "more institutionalized economic segregation" as it would increase the number of

residents dependent on government. Council also plans to take up two previously postponed measures: Item 19, weighing how much time Council and committee meetings should give to public comment, and Item 6, revising electronic campaign finance reporting rules. - Mary Tuma



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## **APD to Collect More Data**

## DECISION A RESULT OF POLICE MONITOR'S 2014 REPORT

The Austin Police Department will begin tracking data on instances in which an officer pulls a driver over and conducts a vehicle search that doesn't result in an arrest or citation, as well as instances in which an officer stops a pedestrian and conducts a search for contraband, according to a presentation from Assistant Chief Brian Manley at the Monday meeting of

the Public Safety Commission. Prior to this year, APD didn't collect that data, as it's not required by the State Code of Criminal Procedure's policy on racial profiling.

Manley mentioned the department's plans to change its policy during the commission's review of the Office of the Police Monitor's 2014 report, which was published last month. The revelation came as Manley discussed APD's perspective on the list of recommendations made by the

Police Monitor Margo Frasier and her office (see "Disproportionate Force," March 11). Manley and Frasier both spoke to the recommendations as part of an action item introduced by Public Safety Commissioner Rebecca Webber.

Manley didn't provide much detail, saying only that the department agrees with the recommendation and has tasked its research and planning team to develop a process for future implementation. But it comes as a welcome development. Conversations about the release of the OPM report

have centered on concerns about racial profiling during traffic stops and pedestrian stop-and-searches. Though comprising only 7.5% of the city's population, the report notes, blacks account for 12% of traffic stops and 24% of all stop-and-searches.

At Monday's meeting, as well as at the March 28 Public Safety Committee meeting, Manley argued that the racial dispari-

ties are due to the fact that policing tends to center on areas where crime clusters, and that crime tends to cluster in a complaint show the allegation to be untrue (thus preventing any chance of a more thorough investigation). Manley also contested the OPM's assertion that the number of external allegations against APD for officer deployment of response-to-resistance "seems low," saying that the department adheres to a liberal definition of responseto-resistance that in many cases does not involve a substantial application of physical force.

The commission originally intended to vote at the April 4 meeting on whether to submit a recommendation that **City Council** consider the policy changes, but ultimately decided to punt the vote to next month -May 2 - so that Webber and longtime Commissioner Mike Levy will have a chance to refine the language of the recommendation. Chief among Levy's concerns (for both

areas that are low-income – and often populated by minorities. He also noted that in 2015, APD found contraband in automo-

biles during traffic stops involving black drivers at a rate of 35% – much higher than the national average of 3%, which would indicate APD's searches are justifiable and not the result of racial profiling, he argued.

Elsewhere on the OPM's recommendation checklist, Manley contended that APD already has a program in place to routinely audit dashcam footage of traffic stops, and said the department is working to figure out a way to better avoid classifying formal complaints as "Ds," the designation used to denote that preliminary investigations into this year's report and future versions) is the inclusion of certain recommendations for benchmarking the OPM's gathered data, reasonable advice considering how statheavy the 94-page report reads. Levy asked that the commission recommend that future reports provide benchmarking against other cities as well as Austin in years past, and add identity-specific context to officers involved in described complaints. He also recommended that Council commend APD for making improvements on racial profiling.

Speaking Monday, Webber acknowledged that APD has made improvements in that regard, yet stressed that there remains room for improvement. "The fact is that black people in Austin have a 1 in 6 chance [of being stop-and-searched] and Hispanics/

Latinos have a 1 in 9 chance while white people in Austin have a 1 in 22 chance," she said. "My resolution was focused on ways APD can continue to improve transparency and trust from the community and I will work with Commissioner Levy to ensure that the resolution we present to the full commission next month also recognizes how far we have come."

Webber - who also serves on the OPM's Citizen Review Panel and at Monday's meeting was named the next chair of the commission (effective May 2) - acknowledged that she's looking forward to preparing a written recommendation proposal for her fellow commissioners. She said the commission - an 11-person board comprised of volunteering civilians - can sometimes lose sight of its objectives as commissioners try to fit the civic endeavor into their personal and professional lives. To that point, Webber said, she's hoping that a renewed focus on working groups meeting between scheduled hearing dates will help ensure that each commissioner's interests are heard - not just in the commission's monthly meetings, but also by City Council.

"On a few key issues, the commission has been really effective. Like the wildland fire issue is coming to mind, and the 9-1-1 call center. The infrequent times that the commission has taken an issue and gone to bat for that, they've really been effective. The issue is that there hasn't been enough of that. I'm hoping, moving forward, that we can work together to be more effective. Send more to Council, because we haven't sent a lot," she said. "One problem in the past is that we're trying to hash out the language of a recommendation to Council during the meeting. It would be way more productive if there was a working group that would draft language, bring it to the commission, get a comment, take it back and rewrite it, then bring it back at the next session and pass it. I'm hoping that's what Mike [Levy] and I will do with this draft regarding racial profiling." - Chase Hoffberger



## Community First! Unveils Microhomes for the Chronically Homeless

Founded by **Alan Graham**, CEO of **Mobile Loaves & Fishes**, **Community First! Village** is a privately funded, 27-acre community with microhomes, RVs, and guest cottages, exclusively for the chronically homeless. Last Saturday's open house event provided a peek into the community that not only provides housing, but a home for some

of Austin's homeless population. While cities like Portland, Seattle, and Nashville have adopted microhomes in efforts to combat homelessness, Graham said his vision is the first of its kind in the U.S. Instead of isolated units, Graham views Community First! as a \$14.5 million mansion, where residents live together and share communal spaces like bathrooms and kitchens to cultivate a sense of community.

"People are coming from all over the U.S. to look at what we're doing here," Graham said. "We're trying to create spaces for people that no matter what economic strata you come from in life, you say, 'I want to live here."

Through a coordinated application process with the **Ending Community Homelessness Coalition** (ECHO), the chronically homeless can apply to live at Community First!, where residents have access to on-site medical and behavioral health care, plus an organic farm, blacksmith shop, and market to develop skills that sustain the community.

The seeds for Community First! were planted 12 years ago, when Graham bought a gently used RV to house a homeless person. After the success of that initiative, he began buying more RVs, eventually forming Community First! Village, which he calls an "RV park on steroids."

Because Austin wouldn't let Graham build tiny homes inside city limits, Graham began developing nearly eight miles away from Downtown, off of Decker Lane. Initially, the idea was met with trepidation by surrounding community members. "We're trying to help our neighbors control what happens in their neighborhoods too, because that's where the crime is, not here," he said.

**Ellis Johnston**, 51, met Graham eight years ago and was offered an RV home. Formerly homeless, Johnston now lives in Community First! and doesn't plan to leave anytime soon. He works three days a week, caring for the fruit trees which provide harvest for the weekly farmers' market, and also helps out with other tasks. "I came to the right spot," Johnston said. "It took a while, but [Graham] helped me start working and eventually he helped me get housing. And here I am, helping to build a community."

The community is governed by three fundamental rules, said Graham. The first, paying rent, which ranges from \$225 to \$360. To help with rent, most residents are eligible for government benefits and have opportunities to work. The second, residents must obey civil law. And the third is following the community association's guidelines.

Currently, there are 40 people living at Community First! and in May that number will increase by 15 a month, with a capacity of 250 by early next year. Although the community can only house 250 people, Graham plans to expand someday and influence other initiatives across the country.

"I think the ultimate vision is this movement that we call 'community first,' where we're inspiring communities into a lifestyle of service with the homeless," Graham said. "If you want to mitigate this issue you've got to quit pointing the finger at Washington. They're not going to solve this problem; they can't; it's impossible. We can at the local level." – Makeda Easter

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## **AISD Explores Its Options**

Board mulls what to do with underused properties

Did you know that the Austin Independent School District has 12 apartments at the Carruth Administration Center on West Sixth? Or that it owns the historic Millett Opera House, currently home to the Austin Club, where Texas' politicos gather to bond and machinate? If not, that puts you with the AISD Board of Trustees, who recently voted to examine 10 underused properties and work out what best to do with them

On March 28, the board issued a request for proposals (RFP) for what are classified as surplus facilities. The list breaks down into three sub-groups. First, there are existing buildings that are underutilized: the former Allan Elementary, the former Baker Junior High (now a teacher training facility), the central offices at the Carruth Center, and the Millett. Then there are two larger properties, the district's Central Warehouse and its Service Center, where AISD doesn't

use all the land. Finally, there are four vacant plots, varying from one Burnet bv acre Middle School to 32 acres on Loyola Lane, that ended up in the district's land bank and aren't being used for much of anything.

At this point, according to AISD Board President Kendall Pace, nothing is off the table.

So if a buyer came forward with a reasonable offer for any of these properties, they'd be heard out. That doesn't mean the district would sell the property, but they'd be heard out. At the same time, the broad scope of the RFP means that more unconventional solutions, like leasing, partnerships with external entities, expansion, relocation of departments, even land swaps, could be on the table. As long as the proposal benefits the core academic mandate of the district, Pace said, "Let's not put restrictions on now."

Pace explained that the process was triggered by "a confluence of events." First, as a precursor to putting together a bond proposal for new construction and repairs, last year the district's Facilities and Bond Planning Advisory Committee started looking at how every AISD property is used. Then in February, Pace, Board Vice President Paul Saldaña, and former President Gina Hinojosa were attending a joint sub-committee with the city and county. Pace said, "AISD staff were talking with city staff about a piece of property that could be viable for affordable housing, and Paul and I looked at each other and said, 'What are you talking about?'"

## The 10 properties are technically classified as surplus: That is, although they may be in use by the district, they are not part of the core academic mission. Some of these have been on the list for years. Saldaña said that, as

a trustee and a former member of the Community Bond **Oversight Commit**tee, he had seen the Austin Club, Baker, and the CAC on similar lists going back to 2010.

News of the RFP sent a brief shudder R of apprehension through at least one part of the commu-

nity. The former Allan campus has been through more than enough trauma in recent years, and has finally settled down into its new role as the Allan Early Childhood Center, a shared space for nonprofits (see

### "Allan Rising," Feb. 5). Austin Voices for Education and Youth administers the social services and charity side for the district: Executive Director Allen Weeks said that when the partners first heard about the list, "it was a lot of panic and misunderstanding." He had to explain that this was just the district doing "due diligence" before considering a bond. He said, "Allan is on there because, although it's an instructional facility, it's not a traditional instructional facility." In fact, he added, "What's happening at Allan is what the project is supposed to be bringing forth. It's a pilot project of what they're looking for. You have an empty building, you find partners, it's a win-win."

This isn't the first time AISD has considered selling at least two of these properties. In 2011, the district placed both the CAC and the Baker Center on the market, before rejecting all bids. So what's changed since then? Bluntly, it's all about the money. "Our situation is dire," said Saldaña. Between declining state contributions and accelerating property tax recapture, AISD is in an ever-deepening hole, and Austin's white-hot

property market could provide a partial solution. For example, even if AISD keeps the Millett, that \$48,000 annual rent it charges seems ridiculously low. Saldaña added, "I'm not saying that selling or renegotiating ground lease is the be-all and end-all, but we're not going to get any relief from the state, so we're going to have to find local options."

VACANT

Those 10 sites are a fraction of a larger discussion about AISD's facilities issues, how best to serve its students. Increasingly, it's a matter of the right facilities in the wrong places. While the district is worrying about overall enrollment dropping, that's not the story all across town - as Pace explained, "Our urban core is a doughnut." For example, there are no longer enough kids in the Allan attendance zone to justify reopening it as a school. But there's been such a massive growth in elementary-age population around the Rundberg corridor that AISD has had to open two campuses there in the last three years - Guerrero Thompson in 2013, and Padron in 2014. At the moment, those kids

## How Corporate Bamboozlers Intend to Widen Inequality in America

The basic problem facing the corporate and political powers who want you and me to swallow their Trans-Pacific Partnership deal is that they can't make chicken salad out of chicken manure.

But that reality hasn't stopped their PR campaign, which pitches their 'salad" as good and good for you! For example, a corporate front group called the Peterson Institute for International Economics recently issued a study blaring the happy news that TPP will increase real incomes in the U.S. by \$131 billion a year. Even if that were true (and plenty of other studies show that it's not), it's a statistic meant to dazzle rather than enlighten, for it skates around the real bottom

line for the American public: an increase in income for whom? In the past 15 years or so, and especially since 2008, it's been made perfectly clear to the workaday majority of people that the corporate mantra of "income growth" benefiting everyone is a deliberate

lie. Practically all of the massive annual increases in U.S. income, which every worker helps produce, now gushes up to the richest one percent, with millionaires and billionaires (the one-tenth of 1-percenters) grabbing the bulk of it.

> Economists have a technical term for this: "stealing." TPP is written specifically to sanction and increase the robbery of the many by the world's moneyed few, including provisions that give additional incentives to U.S. manufacturers to ship more of our middle-class jobs to places like Vietnam, with minimum wages under 65 cents an hour!

Don't be bamboozled by glittery studies. TPP is a manure salad tossed together by the superrich to further enrich themselves at our expense - and it would intentionally exacerbate the widening gulf of inequality in America. are all headed to the already overcrowded Burnet Middle School, a 45-year-old campus in desperate need of renovation. The district desperately needs a middle school there, but with the next bond election not planned until May 2017, both Pace and

Saldaña suggested that the RFP could produce some innovative solutions to localized overcrowding.

Both also note that the plan is no panacea. Even if all 10 properties were sold at market value, the \$95 million they would raise would not even dent the

district's estimated \$1.5 billion deferred maintenance bill. Allan alone needs \$10 million in repairs, and, Saldaña said, "Baker probably twice that."

While kids being educated in crumbling facilities is no joke, the situation has occa-

sionally been comedic: When trustees voted in 2011 to pull the CAC off the market, literally five minutes later the board room ceiling started leaking.

This time around, the important part may be that there were bids on the table in 2011.

## If a buyer came forward with a reasonable offer for any of these properties, they'd be heard out.

Yet while the real estate market may be even hotter in 2016, AISD is already bracing for public resistance. For example, in 2011, part of the reason AISD took Baker off the market was because staff knew there would be

neighborhood opposition to a sale (in fact, Baker is part of the **Hyde Park Neighborhood Plan**, which calls for it to be restored as a working campus.) Saldaña said, "I'm optimistic that we'll get great proposals, but I think at least half of them will drop off."





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**Building a Path to Literacy** 

Educators and nonprofits work to close the achievement gap in Dove Springs

Like most complex subjects, no single label will ever suffice to describe Dove Springs, the Southeast Austin neighborhood where I grew up, but here are a few: Mexican-American, working-class, poor, overlooked, humble, proud, violent, peaceful, ugly, beautiful. Among the labels that are least likely to come up: affluent, privileged.


One of the challenges facing the neighborhood is literacy. Dove Springs' Consuelo Mendez Middle School is on the Texas Education Agency's 2015 list of schools where "improvement is required." The number of AISD students who performed at "Satisfactory Standard or Above" in State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) testing for reading was 79%. The number of Mendez students who met that standard was 62%. In writing, the AISD number was 71%, while Mendez's was 44%. The number of AISD students who tested at the "Advanced Standard" was 22%. The number for Mendez students was 4%.

I put little to no store in standardized testing. If not for corroboration by residents and local educators, I would be skeptical at how much these results really tell us. It may make more sense to see STAAR scores as demographic indicators, rather than measures of teaching success or failure, much less student potential. In this case, the test results appear to shore up what student population numbers would suggest: A little more than 40% of students are English language learners, and 93.5% are "economically disadvantaged." Dove Springs is largely an immigrant population; it is also largely impoverished. Mendez reflects these realities.

## LITERACY AS PEACE OF MIND

The school itself looks much like any other in Austin: meandering, blue and white, behind chain-link fences over a broad swath of real estate between Pleasant Valley and Nuckols Crossing roads. Many neighborhood children, like myself, went from Widén Elementary across the street to Mendez, and on into high school. Where I had the luck of being raised by two highly literate, English-speaking parents who read to me at a very early age (and who forced me out of Mendez and into Kealing Junior High's magnet program when I entered seventh grade), many others have not had that advantage, in which case their progress has relied to a greater degree on what happens inside their schools. In my experience, Mendez was a place of violence, but like any school, it was also a place of love. It is an essential hub for the community that depends on it.

Mendez librarian Ivan Cervantes comes across as gentle, caring, thoughtful, and passionate about the students who visit him. He emphasizes critical thinking, even when it



comes to something as simple as recommending a book. "They would come in all the time and ask me, 'Where's the scary books?" Cervantes says. "I used to point them to generic scary, but then I got to thinking about it and said, well, let me force these children to think. I'll ask them, 'What're you scared of? Are you scared of snakes, are you scared of police brutality, are you scared of ghosts or zombies or aliens? When you tell me what scares you, then I'll help you find a scary book." "What are you scared of?" could be a mind-blowing question for an 11-year-old. No doubt it would, as Cervantes suggests, force the child to think.

Cervantes is adamant about the importance of mental health, and sees the library as a kind of wellness space. In a school and neighborhood suffering under the various strains of poverty, the notion of wellness through literacy is striking. I must admit, as a former student at Mendez, that my memory of the place is one of chaos. When I visited recently, I half-expected an eighth grader to dare me into a fight, the way they did almost every day when I was in sixth grade. Of course, childhood memories loom large. One refrain I have heard in conversations with residents is that the neighborhood has changed.

This may be so, but according to Ofelia Zapata, a resident and representative of Austin Interfaith, teachers at Mendez are still leaving in droves. The Austin American-Statesman reports that 52% of the school's teachers left in 2012 alone. The first years of teaching in a troubled public school can be a wake-up call for bright-eyed young teachers who learn that, rather than engaging with the content they love, they are instead spending most of their time breaking up fights or desperately trying to hold their students' focus. Even as I left the school after my visit with Cervantes, a security officer was rushing up the steps in the opposite direction, a sight that took me back about 20 years. In this environment, literacy as peace of mind can be a valuable perspective, if only that perspective can be taught.

## A TWO-GENERATION PROGRAM

There are programs that provide literacy outreach in the area, though Zapata worries that they vary in quality. There are too many variables, she says, that lead to malfunctions, including a lack of coordination with residents, minimal one-on-one mentoring, and the inherent drawbacks of a transient volunteer force made up of people from outside the neighborhood. "It's not working," she says.

However, Play to Learn, a part of United Way for Greater Austin's "Success by 6" program, avoids some of these shortcomings by including parents; it is, as a 2013 University of Texas report put it, a "twogeneration program." Parents take a free, two-hour/week, eight-week course with their 2- and 3-year-olds that teaches the parents how to play with their kids in a way that helps them improve their language skills, which in turn will give those children

Play to Learn serves low-income families, the vast majority of whom (95%; all numbers are from 2013) are Spanish-speaking. Most of the parents participating (63%) did not graduate high school. But using a variety of activities, parents learn strategies for reading and talking with their children, as

well as methods for accessing community resources such as local libraries. Tips on how to "extend the conversation by asking questions related to your child's interests" encourage what Success by 6 Vice President Sue Carpenter calls "reflective" language, as opposed to "directive" ("Why are you doing that?" vs. "Stop that!"). At the end of each session, families get a chil-

dren's book and some art supplies to take home. Families that attend all eight sessions are given a free Samsung Galaxy tablet equipped with educational apps and linked to useful resources like the city of Austin website. (The program received a \$1 million grant from Samsung Austin Semiconductor in 2012.)

The UT study commissioned to evaluate Play to Learn found that parents reported spending more time reading together and playing games with their children after completing the course, and that they felt more confident about helping their children succeed, and more engaged. Zapata, who helped recruit some of the earliest residents into the program, says, "It was a great success. ... [The families] were committed to going to the library on a weekly basis." This encouraged continued visits after the sessions were over. Additionally, she lauds the program's inclusion of fathers, so that "it wasn't just the moms."

"It works," says Zapata.

Carpenter points out that there are "roughly 28,000 low-income children" up to 4 years of age in Travis County, only 5,000 of whom are receiving any kind of outreach service at all. Seeking to address this shortfall, Play to Learn is serving 275 families this year, including, in particular, children between the ages of 2.5 and 3.5 years. The numbers are daunting, but significant, as the lessons shared during Play to Learn sessions will presumably have a positive impact on participating families for a lifetime. (Carpenter makes a point of noting that coordination with schools in the area has "been great.")

## **A POWER GAP**

If the efforts of programs like Play to Learn, as well as those of dedicated educators such as Cervantes, continue to bear fruit, the future in Dove Springs is bright. But as the city continues along its current course, I can't help but wonder if the neighborhood's literacy stats will improve before the gentrification tide sweeps through. In other words, will today's Dove Springs residents enjoy the benefits of neighborhood

renewal before they are priced out, as so many others in the city have been?

In his 1965 autobiography, Malcolm X described his years in prison, during which he began to read seriously for the first time in his life. "I suppose it was inevitable," he said, "that as my word-base broadened, I could for the first time pick up a book and read and now begin to understand what the

book was saying. Anyone who has read a great deal can imagine the new world that opened." For Malcolm X, his experience with literacy became a passage to empowerment.

And it is power we are talking about. Literacy confidence. It incites bestows a refined capacity for self-preservation. Without power, Dove Springs can't be free.

Upward mobility stagnates. Limited opportunity breeds desperation on all fronts. Access to awareness will be crippled, so that when a speculator offers to buy a home for less than its value, the homeowner might not only misunderstand the fine print, they will lack sufficient regard for the value and scope of their own rights. In a city where the claim to "home" is defined by dollar amounts, literacy is more important than ever. There is much more at stake here than test scores

Fun at Work: Bill Bailey (a former nine-year employee of the water-irrigation network near Grand Junction, Colo., was awarded unemployment benefits in December for being wrongfully fired. The company claimed Bailey was insubordinate and that any complaints he had were merely because he is "too sensitive" to workplace "fun" and unable to "forgive and forget" his supervisors' team-building spirit. According to an administrative law judge, the "fun" included, among other things, detonating unannounced, ear-splitting PVC "potato guns" (using golf balls and other items) on the job and Bailey's boss placing his own feces in a bag inside Bailey's lunch pail. (At one point in the hearing, during the boss' mirthful, carefree descriptions of the "fun," the judge felt the need to advise him of his Fifth Amendment right.) Following the judge's decision, Bailey's two supervisors resigned.

## **Questionable Judgments**

The Agony and Tediousness of "Peeling": The Canadian supermarket chain Sobeys has recently been selling pre-cut avocado halves, sealed in plastic packages. Said a spokesman, the product "eliminates the guesswork ... if you are not familiar with peeling and seeding a fresh avocado." Also, recently, Whole Foods began selling peeled mandarin oranges, sealed in "recyclable" plastic, at \$5.99 a pound (but withdrew the product in March, with an apology and promise to sell the oranges only in their "natural packaging: the peel").

## **The Continuing Crisis**

The Most "Florida" Story: State officials have notified retired pro wrestler Mary Thorn of Lakeland that, according to the law, her pet alligator ("Rambo"), age 15, having grown to 6 feet in length, may no longer be kept at home unless she provides at least 2½ acres of roaming space. She made a public plea in March, warning that confiscating Rambo would kill him, as he is super-sensitive to sunlight (having been raised inside her home) and must wear clothes and sunscreen when outside (though Thorn pointed out that he is "potty-trained" and wags his tail when needing to answer nature's call). At press time, the investigation of Rambo was still ongoing.

The Most "Georgia" Story: David Presley (of Walton County, about 40 miles from Atlanta), 32, for some reason attempted to blow up his riding lawn mower in March – by placing three pounds of the chemical mixture Tannerite in it and then shooting the mower with a semiautomatic rifle. Although he was standing 30 yards away, shrapnel still hit him, severing his leg just below the knee.

The Most "Canada" Story: Ms. Philicity Lafrenier, 25, was charged with several breakand-enter and theft crimes in March in Prince George, British Columbia, after leading police on a half-mile chase as she made her getaway on an ice floe on the Nechako River. When police caught up, she attempted to dispose of items she had stolen (even though still on the ice) by burning them in a small fire, but an officer and a police dog jumped in the water to subdue her.

## Can't Possibly Be True

"Wall of Sound," Updated: Police, finally armed with a warrant after months of neighbors' complaints about loud music, raided Michael Baker's small one-bedroom apartment in Croydon, England, in March and confiscated 34 loudspeakers that Baker had allegedly been using at high volume at "all hours." After entering the home with the aid of a locksmith, police left Baker with only a CD player and a pair of earphones.

Nicholas Ragin finally got his conviction overturned in March, but it took 10 years before the U.S. Court of Appeals declared that his "right to counsel" had been violated because his lawyer slept during various parts of Ragin's conspiracy and racketeering trial. (His sentence had 20 more years to run.) One juror later recalled that lawyer Nikita Mackey slept "almost every day, morning, and evening" for "30 minutes at least." Once, according to court documents, after the trial judge called Mackey's name loudly, only belatedly getting a response, Mackey "jumped up and sort of looked around and was licking his lips ... and looked sort of confused and looked around the room." (The prosecutor said she intends to retry Ragin.)

## **New World Order**

In March, *Foreign Policy* magazine noted that someone had created a "hot male migrants" account on the photo-sharing application Instagram: "Someone is going through photos of migrants and refugees, saving ones of men thought of as hot." (Many of the men, of course, have survived harrowing journeys and even lost friends and family members while fleeing Syria and other war-torn lands. Wrote one Instagram user, of a man who had turned her head, "He's gorgeous. Am I going to hell for thinking that?")

## **Bright Ideas**

North Carolina State University scientists, in a "proof of concept" study published in March, claim they have found a promising alternative for eliminating certain infections – even when no known antibiotic will work. The solution, the researchers write, is to genetically modify maggots (which are well-known to feed naturally off of infected tissue) to gobble up the infections and release, as "waste," human growth hormone (as they showed in the study, it could be done with a strain of green bottle fly magots).

Felicia Burl, 33, who crashed her car (killing her passenger) after running a red light, fled on foot and later tried to foil DNA evidence against her to avoid charges. While in lockup, Burl, with a 29-conviction rap sheet, knew a mouth swab was upcoming and tried to contaminate it by – as police later learned – having two other women spit into her mouth just before the test. She was convicted anyway, and a court in Stamford, Conn., is expected to order a 10-year sentence at Burl's next hearing.

## **Least Competent Criminals**

Massachusetts state troopers initially found a few drug items in a search of the vehicle of Carrie Tutsock, 24, at a traffic stop in March along Interstate 91 near Hatfield, Mass., but Tutsock and her two companions proceeded to worsen the situation. The troopers seemed satisfied with finding three drug pipes, a couple of syringes and several baggies of drugs, and began to write their report as a "possession" case, but en route to the state police barracks, a trooper said he overheard one suspect whisper to another, "I don't think they found all the stuff in the car." The police searched it again and this time found three digital scales with white residue, along with another 230 baggies of heroin, and the charges were upped to "intent to distribute."



Not a single flying varmint of North America's largest colony of Mexican free-tailed bats, happily ensconced beneath the Congress Avenue Bridge, will be discomfited by Parker's interactive concert that's set to premiere as a final part of this year's Fusebox Festival.

The event is called *Bat/Man*, and you're invited to attend, and – like all of Fusebox – it's free. (See "Fusebox Condensed." at right.)

Besides the bats, Parker tells us, the shells of giant mollusks are a big part of the composition. "And funnels," says the man who's also in charge of the SoundSpace events for the Blanton Museum of Art, the man responsible for last year's uproarious *Traffic Jam* concert that included community participants performing a chorus on their car horns. "*Bat/Man* will also have a megaphone choir," he adds, smiling.

Right – our interest is definitely piqued. So we sit down with Parker among the diversity of neighborhood sounds saturating the patio of Thunderbird Coffee on Manor and we ask the guy as politely as we can, "What the hell *is* this *Bat/Man* thing?"

**Steve Parker:** It's a piece for bat echolocation under the Congress Avenue Bridge. The bat calls are going to be pitch-shifted in real time so people can hear them, and then they'll be looped and manipulated in various ways. It also features an ensemble of conch-shell players.

Austin Chronicle: OK, is it that you had these two cool ideas – bat calls! conch shells! – and threw them together? Or is there some relationship between the conchs and bats?

SP: It's echoes. It's all about how sound reacts in space and specifically how it reacts with large concrete structures - in this case, the bridge. So we're going to have the bat sounds engaging with the structure, and the conch shells, and we're going to have funnels - all these directional sounds that are produced and bounce off of different things. And the way you perceive it, the way you experience these physical objects, has to do with the way the sound is produced and how far away the objects are from you, and what they're made out of. And we've got a megaphone choir - that's also directional sound that will be echoing off different things. And the funnel horns, which are basically like garden hoses with an oil-can funnel at one end. And handmade echolocation devices. which were developed in the mid-20th century as a way for visually impaired people to perceive an aural map of their surroundings. AC: Are the echolocation devices that are being played or the pitch-shifted bat calls going to, like, fuck with the bats? SP: No no no, the bats are operating on a

certain frequency, and we're not going to be doing anything on that frequency. We can't even perceive that frequency ourselves, for the most part. The calls are going to be pitchshifted, so it's not going to jam their signal. Like any other live concert down around the bat-range, it's not going to mess with the bats. **AC:** What led you to do this sort of thing?

SP: I was walking under the bridge at Waller Creek - there's a smaller bat colony under there - fewer than 1.5 million bats living under that bridge - and I was immersed in this chattering sound. And I was really interested in it, so I did some poking around online. But it wasn't until I met this bat scientist in Germany, two years ago, that things started coming together. I was playing a concert there, and I met this guy who happened to be from San Antonio. And he was there recording bats. And I told him how I'd experienced the bats at Waller Creek, and we kept in touch and started messing around with sound. I've also been particularly interested in the music of Alvin Lucier, who's a composer who works in sound - mainly the physical properties of sound and how we perceive sound. One of the pieces that he wrote in the Sixties was called *Vespers*, which was for an ensemble of echolocation devices, where the performers are essentially producing an aural map of their surroundings. It's a pretty open score, and that's the coda of our performance – the realization of Lucier's piece, but on a larger scale. And we're using his original designs for the echolocation devices, with arduino technology, to create a large ensemble.

*AC:* Where did you source the conch shells? **SP:** There's a guy in Florida, the Conch King, who has a website – it's kind of a hilarious website – where, as soon as it's loaded, there's this MIDI classical music that's playing while he narrates a sort of description of the site. And he actually enhances the conch shells, cuts off the ends and puts brass mouthpieces on them. So that's where we're getting them. *AC:* And the funnel pipes?

**SP:** They're something that are used in a lot of demonstrations for school children, to show them how a brass instrument works. It demonstrates how the length of the tube determines the overtone series that you're playing, and the funnel demonstrates projection. It's an abstraction of a French horn

It also features an ensemble of conch-shell players." - Steve Parker or *any* brass instrument, really, and you can make them easily from a garden hose and an oil-can funnel.

*AC:* Is this the first time that you'll be doing a megaphone choir?

**SP:** Yes, it is. I wanted to do something with voice, so we have the Texas Choral Consort with Brent Baldwin, and there's going to be a workshop period where we develop the vocabulary for what we're using. But it'll be spatial, so the choir begins not onstage but *away* from stage, reflecting their sounds off various surfaces, and then eventually gravitating toward the central axis where a lot of the performance happens. Same with the conch shells and the funnels.

AC: Let me pretend that I'm a complete philistine for a minute here, like I'm your 87-year-old aunt whose favorite musician was Lawrence Welk. So, ah, "Why do you DO this? Why don't you do any NORMAL music that NORMAL people will like?"


**SP:** Well, I do. I went to school for classical music at, among other places, UT. But I prefer to work in a realm that's maybe not as saturated. I'm also interested in creating opportunities for people to engage in sound in novel ways, in ways they wouldn't normally experience sound. For them to engage interactively and on a deeper level than just listening passively.

AC: So the audiences at Bat/Man are going to be involved in the concert?

**SP:** It's an immersive performance, so they'll be immersed in sound. But also, at the end of the piece, we'll be providing them with some sort of echolocation device, whether it's one of the battery-operated devices or something simple like a clicker, but *something* so they're able to interact within the space with the sound that they're producing. **AC:** Did you propose this to Fusebox, or did [Fusebox director] Ron Berry say, "Hey, Steve, do something for us!"

SP: I proposed it to them sometime last year, I think even before we did the Traffic Jam piece, and I'm glad to finally be able to realize this. We're still kind of workshopping a lot of it, because it is a cooperative process. I tend to work very cooperatively with the different organizations or the different communities involved, so for this there's a pretty substantial phase that involves workshops where I'm building echolocation devices with Austin Soundwaves and Anthropos Arts, and workshopping the conch shells with some of my trombone students, and with Texas Choral Consort. We'll be doing a device-building workshop during Fusebox, too. It's a multilayered process where the end result is a big spectacle of performance.

Bat/Man will be performed Sunday, April 10, 7pm, at the Bat Observation Lawns on the south end of the Congress Avenue Bridge. For more info, visit www.fuseboxfestival.com.



## FUSEBOX CONDENSED

If you're counting on doing most of your Fusebox Festival activity during the second weekend of the annual hybrid arts hootenanny, be advised: There is no second weekend this year.

Where most successful festivals in Austin expand, adding more days or weeks on to their schedules, the ever-off-the-beaten-path Fusebox has opted to contract in 2016: packing 60 interdisciplinary arts projects into five days instead of the usual 10. It's a bid by founder and Artistic Director Ron Berry to give festivalgoers a more concentrated schedule in hopes that more patrons from outside Austin might be lured here for the fest.

As usual, Berry has booked an exciting roster of artists from across the nation and the globe, with this year's participants hailing from as far away as Angola, Argentina, Hong Kong, Japan, Mexico, and Russia. Among them:

 Composer/artist Mark Mothersbaugh, who will lead a performance of orchestral versions of DEVO covers and his compositions for films, performed on a six-sided keyboard of his own invention
 Artist collective My Barbarian, which will present the results of its residency at UT-Austin's Visual Arts Center, during which 10 Austinites will be led through a five-stage workshop

• Royal Court Theatre's *Manwatching*, in which text about female desire written by an anonymous woman will be read aloud by a man who hasn't seen it before the performance

 Tetsuya Umeda of Osaka, who will create a sitespecific installation/performance rooted in strange and surprising physics experiments that he will perform in front of an audience

Naturally, the ATX will be well represented, with the Rude Mechs taking a second swing at their latest show in development, Field Guide (and as near as we can tell, the Brothers Karamazov and stand-up comedy are still in the mix): Catastrophe Theory Arts, giving us a second look at its Notes on the Classification of Spectral Lines. the Art of Water Writing, and Other Important Ephemera; Austin Revolutions Per Minute, which will provide a curated collection of local music on vinyl for you to enjoy in special listening rooms; Jules Buck Jones' Animal Facts Club, which will mash-up art and science in an hourlong lecture/performance on The Biodiversity of Texas; Los Outsiders, who will serve up an over-thetop absurdist fashion show called Sew Wasted; and composer Matthew Steinke, who will create a musical installation in which common iron objects are used to create sounds and tones through electromagnetism.

This year's festival hub, where Fuseboxers can meet nightly to connect with one another and festival artists, will be the Austin Saengerrunde Hall, 1607 San Jacinto.

And for the third year in a row, Fusebox will be entirely free to attend, under the Free Range Art initiative. Reservations for festival events can be made at www.fuseboxfestival.com. – *Robert Faires*

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## ARTS LISTINGS Love *Right There*

For *Bright Half Life*, Theatre en Bloc couples an intimate story with a relentlessly personal performance space

Magic needs a place to happen. Dimensions are irrelevant, so long as that place fits one simple criterion: It must be the *right* place. The perfect pairing of script and venue doesn't come along often, but when it does, the environment and experience become a character unto themselves. With *Bright Half Life* by Tanya Barfield, Theatre en Bloc couples an already intimate story with a relentlessly personal performance space.

Director Jenny Lavery packs just 20 people per show into the Pony Shed at the Vortex, plus two actors: Krysta Gonzales as Vicki and Marina DeYoe-Pedraza as Erica. Upon entering the

space, which I'd estimate (roughly) at only 170 square feet, Vicki and Erica are already seated next to each other on a small bench against the far wall. The audience squeezes in next to them, lining the walls and hugging the corners, leaving only a generously estimated 10-by-10-foot playing space. There are no props. No set to speak of (save the bench). Only a handful of delicately dangling lights help guide us through an emotional roller coaster. Or is it a Ferris wheel? Once the show begins, subtle changes in said lights (and contextual evidence in dramatic action) indicate shifts in time. *Bright Half Life* is temporally jumbled, shuffling

events in these two lovers' lives and presenting them in random order. Their first meeting and last take place over an hour's time, with dates, fights, marriage, children, skydiving, and Ferris wheel anxieties all delivered

BRIGHT HALF LIFE The Pony Shed at the Vortex, 2307 Manor Rd. www.theatreenbloc.org Through April 9 Running time: 1 hr. sporadically throughout – the moments of their lives together a game of 52 Pick-Up strewn about the venue floor. There is great beauty in this chaos. Our memories of our own rela-

tionships are not likely linear either – more an amorphous blob of consciousness, memories, and events than a regimented timeline. Sense memory plays havoc on our recollection, and this play captures the bittersweet flow from joy to anguish and back.

Gonzales and DeYoe-Pedraza exhibit exemplary skill in their portrayals of these characters under the play's conditions, shifting gears with intention and intensity, never



missing a beat. Every time change is clear, every shift in focus and moment deliberate and acutely executed. It feels as though we're peering into a collective dream half-remembered rather than two sides of the same story, and the detailed work put in by Lavery and her actors is evident from the start. The venue offers no escape from this story, no retreat into the darkness of the house – in fact, all audience members are well-lit and, you know, *right there*. This adds an element of connection, the occasional flitting of the eye causing unintentional eye contact with another patron to remind us just how human this story is.

Theatre en Bloc's *Bright Half Life* shares interesting similarities with Sherrod Curry Productions' *The Last Five Years*, reviewed

last week. Both productions took plays about rising and falling relationships, told in nonlinear fashion, and staged them in rather cozy venues, and both were heavily female-driven - excepting the male music director for The Last Five Years, there's not a Y chromosome to be seen in either show, onstage or off. At a time when American theatre is embroiled in a debate about the lack of/need for more good plays written and produced by women, for women, or about women, this utter win from Theatre en Bloc provides proof that such works exist and we should all be looking harder for them and giving them our support. A perfect mixture of time, place, and talent, Bright Half Life had me invested and reflective and eager for more work in nontraditional spaces.



Down the rabbit hole.

Anyone who's toured the realm of the Red and White Queens and Mad Hatter and March Hare will know what that means. It's how Alice tumbles from a world of logic and reason into one of nonsense and irrationality. Typically, we've observed her fall from the comfortable remove of an easy chair at home or a seat in a theatre, with a page, stage, or screen to separate us from the lunacy that is Wonderland. But we don't get off that easily when Underbelly is running the show. In adapting Lewis Carroll's tale for Zach Theatre, this award-winning Austin theatre company employs the same approach that made its slip river the talk of the 2013 Cohen New Works Festival at the University of Texas: Move the audience with the show. In slip river, that meant patrons following its orphan hero into the Winship Drama Building basement, racing down narrow corridors and under stages as he chased freedom along an underground railground. Here, it's winding around and through buildings on Zach's campus in an urgent quest to find Alice. We drop down the rabbit hole, too.

And no matter how intimately you may know Wonderland and its inhabitants, the story takes on a very different feel when it's you coming face-to-eggshell with Humpty Dumpty, being addressed by the enigmatic Caterpillar. or having the Red Queen threaten off with your head. The strangeness of Carroll's topsyturvy world becomes more immediate and disorienting, and you feel a good deal more empathy for poor Alice. Fortunately, we aren't left to wander aimlessly on our own as she is. Like concierges considerate of a tourist's unfamiliarity with the territory, playwrightdirectors Katie Bender and Gabrielle Reisman helpfully provide guides for our journey: four animals (Tortoise, Lizard, Mouse, and Dodo), each of whom takes charge of one-quarter of the audience and leads it in a different direction. If you pause to consider that these four groups of around 30 folks apiece must all encounter the same characters and experience the same nine scenes before reuniting in the theatre for the Knave of Hearts' trial, all without lengthy overlaps or delays, and how smoothly the whole operation moves, then you may well marvel at the ingenuity and coordinating skills of Bender and Reisman, who I suspect conducted military campaigns in their past lives.

But that's a thought that would only occur to Big People - as those of us taller than this show's target demographic are called here. Everyone else is far too busy learning the unbirthday song meant to distract that decapitation-happy Red Queen (a crisply haughty Madison Weinhoffer), serving as wickets in her croquet game, solving the riddle posed by the Caterpillar (Joseph Urick, equally affable and abstruse), sucking on a cinnamon mint so they can shrink to get through a passage, getting their Wonderland visas (which niftily double as hats and boats!), and avoiding the most ferocious White Rabbit ever (Urick again, but with serious road rage). How can they dwell on the show's clockwork workings (or even admire Mercedes O'Bannion's joyously trippy outfits) when they have so many places to go and unusual characters to meet - like Francesca Douglas' delightfully know-itall Humpty Dumpty, Chase Brewer's earnest Knave of Hearts and sweetly dotty Sheep Duchess (apparently relocated to Wonderland from Hoboken), and Nicholas Kier's sweetly foggy Paper Queen. Not to mention helping Alice (a poised and smart Trinity Johnston at our performance) get home and reconcile with her parents.

This Alice, you see, is contemporary and temperamental; it's her anger that breaks the world and sends her to Wonderland, where the irrationality and rage she encounters reflects her own. And she can't get Wonderland's figures to settle down until she does. Yes, it's a pointed message that Reisman and Bender deliver here, but it works. Before we can come home through the looking glass, we have to see ourselves in it. *– Robert Faires*



### "FRANK SELBY: HIGH WRITER" Lora Reynolds Gallery, 360 Nueces #50, 512/215-4965 www.lorareynolds.com Through May 28

It's significant that the Lora Reynolds Gallery doesn't include wall labels. Labels are a crutch, and I can't stand them. In the case of "Frank Selby: High Writer," the lack of labels adds emphasis to the best thing about the gathered work, which is its discord. The show features only eight pieces, but much joy comes from trying to fill the gaps between them. A medium-sized painting of a sculpted head is followed by three much smaller graphite renderings of black-and-white collages made from film stills, which are then followed by a larger painting of a brightly colored textile. The other pieces are no more obviously cohesive than these, and I find this thrilling. Each piece pops, and while they find their true strength in conversation with one another, individually they provide ample opportunity for query and surprise. I have no clue what is happening in Johnson Weekend, one of the filmstill collages, which features a man in a suit, glaring from a crowded room as if he's been captivated by something ugly, but it doesn't matter. I am given enough information to want to know, and that is a victory.

For this series, Selby took images of "valorized" objects from books and meticulously copied them in graphite and paint. The basic question he seems to want to answer is: What, if anything, is honest about an image? By attempting to re-create a photograph, which he obviously cannot do perfectly, he is emphasizing the image's failure to be real.

As I mentioned, the pieces are at their best as a group. The textile painting, *Mat*, might turn decorative if isolated. This is a result of the work's most exciting quality, which is its role as documentation of an artist in the midst of discovery. Selby seems to be figuring out the fundamental nature of the rela-



tionship between images and objects – between artifice and truth. It is a compelling adventure to be on and an intriguing one to witness.

The statement that accompanies the show is heavy (the word "semiotics" comes up), but just as I'm uninterested in wall labels, I also don't need the theory. Anyway, the statement hardly touches on what, to me, really makes the series

special: the story of these specific objects in the context of Selby's exploration of truth. For example, the artist mentions that a previous incarnation of the series focused on photographs of French political protests, but he got tired of people thinking the protests were the point, so he moved on to other source material. One of the new pieces, Brooch, is described as depicting an object that was formed, in part, by political circumstances, but that continuity in his content is dismissed for the sake of the image-versus-reality conversation, as though the implications of politics entwined with photography's potential to lie are simply irrelevant. I don't buy that. I want Selby's politics, whatever they are, to be front and center.

Actually, I think Selby secretly loves his content,

or at least he should, because he has a talent for selecting imagery that engages. If he can continue to mine that drama and merge its meaning with that of his process, I believe he'll find the truth he's looking for, and we will all be beneficiaries. But even if he doesn't, "High Writer" offers some truth of its own and ultimately coalesces as a rewarding investigation into what it means to question. – Sam Anderson-Ramos



## The Struggle Is Real

Texas Longhorn Baseball (12-17, 3-3 Big 12) is in a bad place right now. After losing five of their last six, there's a genuine sense of legitimate danger of a losing season something not seen since 1998. Currently sitting sixth on the Big 12, the Horns haven't been able to find solid ground, mainly due to their struggles at the plate and getting on base. Hitting only .257, good for seventh in the conference - and a league-low .336 onbase percentage - they are generally struggling to do anything but strike out. The Horns' general power outage, given the team's 2.23 strikeout-to-walk ratio, is disconcerting.

Junior catcher Tres Barrera has been the primary bright spot, hitting .305 with 20 RBI and 48 total bases. However, his aggression - 26 strikeouts to 13 walks, in 29 games has led to a .390 on-base percentage. The team's overall defensive play is also among the worst in the conference.

The Art Car Parade in Houston will have you laughing, crying, and wondering why. Like a Shakespearean comedy, it's all in good fun, although there are more than a few head-scratching moments - but art doesn't need a reason why. For instance, in the 2015 Art Car Parade there was a car covered with toys, plastic jewels, Christmas-tree lights, and a cow skull wired to the grill. ## Austin Sol Makes Its Home Debut in the American Ultimate Disc League

The sport of **ultimate** (aka ultimate Frisbee) officially got its start during the counterculture movement of the Sixties at Columbia High School in Maplewood, N.J. It quickly spread throughout the country, and eventually the world. While retaining the ideals of its humble beginnings as a self-refereed game (known as the Spirit of the Game), it also now boasts a high level of skill and competition and is possibly best known for the spectacular highlights often featured on SportsCenter's Top Plays. This Saturday, Central Texas sports fans can see the game up close as our own Austin Sol makes its home debut in the 26-team American Ultimate Disc League.

For the uninitiated, ultimate is a noncontact sport incorporating elements of football, soccer, and basketball. Players move the disc up the field with either several short passes or one long throw, and cannot "travel" or run with the disc in their possession. A point is scored by completing a pass to a teammate in the end zone. If a pass is intercepted, knocked down, out of bounds, or dropped, it is a turnover and the other team takes possession. Making a pass or scoring attempt while the other team resets is advantageous.

While the AUDL does utilize referees, they keep the Spirit of the Game intact with the Integrity Rule. If a call is made in your favor, or your team's favor, you can overturn the call to the benefit of your opponent, thus maintaining the true spirit of the origins of the game and promoting respect and honor among the teams and fans. The endless "flopping" of soccer and basketball is nowhere to be seen here.

Via email, team owner **Patrick Christmas** describes the games as "Athletic! We play on football fields and a good thrower can hit any point on that field. There is no running with the disc or contact, but the way a disc floats, compared to a football, allows for those *SportsCenter* plays where athletic guys dive around their opponent to make the catch on a regular basis."

As far as the squad goes, Christmas says that "**Jeff Loskorn** and **Chase Cunningham** are two big names, with Jeff on the USA



national team and Chase winning gold with the U-23 national team last year. **Brett Gramann** is an Austin native who was named college rookie of the year in 2015. Then we have a host of college stars, like UT captains **Logan Kinney** and **Joel Clutton**."

Christmas' goals with the franchise are to "... introduce Austinites to our fast-paced game, fun game-day program, and a friendly atmosphere full of high fives. The team has set a goal of making the playoffs in their first year and are putting in the effort to make it happen. Long term we want to be part of the soul of Austin – a game that everyone in town is familiar with and introducing a greater number of kids to the teamwork, spirit, and athleticism that make ultimate a lifetime activity."

Austin dropped its franchise debut last Saturday in Dallas, 30-18 vs. the Roughnecks. Fans can look forward to lots of high fives and high-flying action this Saturday as the Sol hopes to get in the win column hosting those same Roughnecks. After the game, head over to the Tavern to meet the squad. The AUDL season consists of 14 regular-season games with Austin hosting seven home tilts at fields across town: two at House Park, one at Vandegrift High School, and four at Westwood High School. – Mark Fagan



# Review: Small Victory

## THE NEXT GENERATION IN AUSTIN SPEAKEASIES

It's little wonder that nightlife keeps returning to the concept of speakeasies. As with music or fashion, the closer a bar veers toward respectability, the less sexy it seems. An affair held in the vinyl-upholstered hotel bar of a Holiday Inn hardly counts as an affair at all. Leave those to beige middle managers and Hollister-clad tourists. True illicitness demands dim lighting and unmarked doors. And ice that clinks instead of rattles.

Small Victory may have an annotated cocktail menu, but owners and hospitality vets Josh Loving and Brian Stubbs seem to understand that the appeal of an evening out isn't only about what a bar is serving. The scene at the Seventh Street speakeasy is winkingly dishabille, from the nearly unmarked door to the ice-blue crushed velvet of the long banquettes, and the wallpaper – Dan Funderburgh's "City



Park" for Flavor Paper if you want to Google it – folding renderings of rats, pigeons, and fire hydrants into a traditional damask. At our last visit during the height of South by Southwest, a tabletop Christmas tree still twinkled on the bar counter, giving the room the feel of Lala's after a good scrubbing.

Still, atmosphere only goes so far with our city's increasingly sophisticated craft cocktail palate. There, Loving is certainly no slouch, with a decadelong hospitality career that has included stints at Fino, Vino Vino, Midnight Cowboy, Weather Up, McGuire Moorman, and Half Step – where he led the much ballyhooed ice program. His approach at Small Victory is historical, drawing from recipes developed not only from the voguish period directly prior to Prohibition, but the full craft canon. Each drink is listed on the menu with an illustration, the recipe, a contextual blurb, and a citation. It's geeky, but charmingly so.

The martini menu is case in point. Presented as a flow chart, it helps drinkers cut through what they think they want to what they actually want. There's a refreshing lack of snobbery here. The chart lists both gin and the much-maligned vodka. Dirty isn't a dirty word either, they'll just steer you to a spirit that doesn't interfere with the brine.

The bar opened with a very limited menu of basics like the Manhattan and Sidecar, but has since expanded to a full range of martinis, cocktails, and punches that cover a wide range of personal tastes. Those wanting something more fruity can choose from a pair of reworked tiki standards. His Hurricane (\$11) removes the treacly, artificial sweet of



Bourbon Street with a house passion fruit syrup. The Singapore Sling (\$12), a grenadine atrocity through much of the latter part of the 20th century, reclaims its more sophisticated roots.

The Dama de la Noche Crusta (\$14) has a similar tropical feel – pineapple and lime juice, curaçao, Angostura, and orange-flower water anchored by cognac – as does the Daisy de Santiago (\$12), using the base trio of the daiquiri (rum, lime, simple) with soda and a vellow Chartreuse floater.

SMALL Brown liquors are well repre-VICTORY sented with the Maple Leaf (\$12), a fairly doctrinaire inter-108 E. Seventh pretation of the spiced bourbon Mon.-Sat., 5pm-1am cocktail with lemon, real maple www.smallvictory.bar syrup, and a dusting of cinnamon. Scotch and sherry combine in the Artists' Special (\$11), with a quick swap of house grenadine for red currant syrup. The foundational flavors will be welcome to any sour fan, but the sweet sherry evens out the tart. Prefer tequila to whiskey? Go for the Rosita (\$13): First recorded in an Eighties Mr. Boston guide according to the menu, it's a wonderfully complex blend of reposado, Campari, Italian and French vermouths, and

bitters. Fans of boulevardiers or negronis should order it in twos.

Be warned, however. Not all of the cocktails are booze-forward, but they all pack a punch. Small Victory does serve food – Antonelli's cheese (natch), charcuterie and house-sliced ham, olives, and nuts – but you might want to line your stomach before settling in a booth. Granted, it would be difficult to squeeze in a raw bar or any sort of hot food offerings in the micro space, but some

good, crusty breads and quality butter would augment the careful sourcing of the current list, and possibly prevent a few stumbles down the stairs. We'll add that to our wish list.

We'll add that to our wish list, but it's hardly a stumbling

block. There's few bars in town with the commitment to quality that Small Victory has. I am hard-pressed to think of another cocktail bar with an actual wine program. But somehow Stubbs and Loving were able to pack a whole lot of seriousness in a space that never feels academic. That's no small feat, no matter how they chose to name it.

There are some weeks, like this one, when I struggle with something to say about the Austin food scene. It's not that there's a lack of fodder.

Just last night, I was wowed by a beet, bone marrow, and cricket miso dish from chef Charles Zhou at the Odd Duck Brewed Food collaboration and then later by the cocktails at Jessica and Michael Sanders' seductive new bar, Backbeat, across the street. This week an incredibly talented Austin chef, Emmer & Rye's Kevin Fink, was named one of *Food & Wine*'s best new chefs. This month is

packed with can't-miss events, from Live Fire! to the East Austin Urban Farm Tour to the marquee Austin Food and Wine Festival. For someone



who cares about food, this is an extraordinary time and place.

But sometimes, food writing seems confining. It seems flat and dry, where the

experience of enjoying food is anything but. The success of Zhou's dish was in its sensuality, the way comforting smells and textures overrode any disgust one might have in eating whole crickets. It was the unexpected texture of fermented beet noodles and the salt air of the miso. It was the slightly rude smoked malt in the Jester King Gotlandsdricka it was paired

with. A GIF of my eyes rolling back upon first taste might approximate the moment. The previous few sentences do not. That is not meant to disparage my trade. Food writing can tell truths about the human condition as elegantly as fiction. No one reading M.F.K. Fisher's wartime recollections or Diana Kennedy's recently re-released classic *Nothing Fancy* could describe either writer as pedestrian.

Besides both of them being immeasurably talented, they had the benefit of being connected to the world. The *Chronicle* food section's raison d'être is local coverage. I do feel honored to be able to document Austin's cultural history, just as my predecessor, the irreplaceable Virginia B. Wood, did for so many years. There are certainly plenty of less interesting towns in the world, but when you spend too much time here, it starts to feel hopelessly provincial. If everybody already knows each other's business anyway, what use is there in telling stories? Familiarity hasn't exactly bred contempt, but it has been numbing. I know this feeling will pass. Food is ultimately about humanity, a subject that can never really get old. There are still thousands of new people to talk to, new things to taste, new GIFs to be made when I roll back my eyes. I am a writer, so I will turn to writing to process all of those things, just as I am turning to writing to process my difficulty in writing in the first place (I know, how meta).

But maybe that's not the right approach. Sparks can only roar into fires with enough oxygen. And maybe the way to get that is to stop thinking about how I will describe the act of eating Austin food and start thinking about just eating, chewing instead of merely swallowing. (I'm willing to admit here that this whole column may be an elaborate way to put in a vacation request.)

Austin food still has all the exhilaration that drew me to it in the first place, but life can only be lived in the moment.

## **Review:** Paperboy

#### EASTSIDE TRAILER WAKES UP BREAKFAST

Whether it's the most important meal or not, no American meal carries as much currency as breakfast. It's the daydream innocence of Fifties diners and the lonely comfort of Eighties cartoons. It's the promise of stability for Holly Golightly and a source of mocking for Kurt Vonnegut. When the writers of *Parks and Recreation* needed to reconcile Leslie Knope and Ron Swanson's friendship before the series finale, they did it through breakfast.

Maybe we can blame all that cultural weight for breakfast being a bit staid. Even in the most innovative culinary capitals, breakfast remains largely French toast and Benedicts, bacon and eggs. It's all very reassuring, but



sometimes one longs for a little variety in the a.m. meal that isn't leftover pizza. Paperboy, the cult trailer from owner Ryan Harms and Odd Duck chef Zechariah Perez, doesn't throw out the rulebook entirely. It's still sandwiches, coffee, and hash. There's still bacon and

eggs. But the Eastside breakfast spot works within those forms to break through the cliches.

Both of the sandwiches, served on toasted brioche, deliver brisk flavors. The B.E.C. (\$7) starts with

thickly sliced bacon and a picturesque sunnyside-up egg, then adds the tang of pimento cheese. The heartier steak and egg (\$9) adds flank steak to the egg, all roused with a smear of chimichurri mayo. The roasted sweet potato hash (\$7), with chunks of braised pork belly and a poached egg, has just the right serving size to save the heavier ingredients from hijacking the morning. The vinegar zip of the coffee





mayo keeps the starchy and fatty ingredients from plodding through the palate.

The two toasts are lighter still. Keeping with Austin's seasonally focused ethos, the exact mix of toppings rotates according to vegetable and fruit availability. On our visit, the sweet (\$6) was more fresh than treacly, with a bouncy mix of tangerine and strawberry, held down with ricotta, granola, and a drizzle of honey. As with the hash, a bright element saves the savory toast (\$6) from being

featuring field greens and radish, it's an essential kick-starter. And it couldn't be more well-matched to the outdoor setting.

Atmosphere is mostly beside the point with trailers, but like the now-closed trailer location of Kvoten. Paperbov has transformed the grounds far past its empty lot roots. There's uncommon attention paid to the total guest experience from the mix of seating (schoolhouse sets, traditional picnic, and scattered white chairs) to the grounds (graphic gravel and sand cordoned off with a metal divider and scattered with desert plants). In the early spring, it was a good place to warm up with a cup of coffee. In the summer, it will be great for absorbing vitamin D before the afternoon scorch. Whatever the weather, with its midcentury soundtrack, it's not the type of place where you'll want to rush.

One quibble: We wish there were a few more drink options other than hot coffee, cold brew, and freshly squeezed orange juice, even if across-the-street Quickie Pickie readily fills in the gaps. We did sneak a bottle of bubbles one visit, and although we were not stopped, we are not altogether sure if that was bad behavior. But how else were we supposed to turn breakfast into brunch? – Brandon Watson

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## **Tales of Ordinary Madness**

#### AFS SCREENS ACCLAIMED ARABIAN NIGHTS TRILOGY by Kahron Spearman

"We're living in a time of surrealism. We may look at surrealists, and say, 'They were the prophets of our time,'" says Lars Nilsen, programmer for the Austin Film Society, speaking on the potential impact of Portuguese director Miguel Gomes. Gomes' ambitious Arabian Nights trilogy is set around a particularly influential and damaging period for Portugal, and its mostly injurious government austerity programs. It's a challenging audiovisual affair, centered on Gomes' charged

resentment and (perhaps earned) self-righteousness - equally pointed, melancholic, and absurdly comedic.

"The films aren't funny from wall to wall, but I think each film has a part that is very funny and very satirical - much in the way of (Spanish filmmaker and satirist)

Luis Buñuel. Gomes is very angry with what's happened with the austerity programs - it's right there in each film," explains Nilsen. The director takes on One Thousand and One Nights' structure and framing, and even introduces a punk Scheherazade - played by Crista Alfaiate - as principal in his triptych. It could be easily argued Gomes himself plays the storyteller, creating another layer on top.

The first installment - The Restless One - sets up the story, starting with fused docu-fictions on the closing of a shipyard and a rather catastrophic wasp problem. In the midst, a downtrodden Gomes (on camera and hooded)

attempts to leave his own project in conspicuous fashion, which could be seen as both hilariously confounding and concerning - which is clearly Gomes' intent. He starts you with a message about the conflict between straightforward storytelling and politics – then proceeds to satirically work the fuzzy and layered lines between both.

The Desolate One, the second film, reaches into the causal relationship of Portugal's crisis moment. Gomes hits themes of corruption – both on a larger

scale and its broad, day-to-day banality – for which all of us are guilty, and subconsciously feed its machinations. The featured scene is the theatrical (and overtly political) "Tears of the Judge," the second tale of the film, in which a For tickets and more info, see www.austinfilm.org. judge attempts to rule on an

increasingly bizarre case, that ends up so god-awfully convoluted and all-implicating, she's reduced to tears.

The third film, The Enchanted One, relies on a fantastical and absurd merging of distant fantasy and present day, with Scheherazade leading and narrating future tales. Man's need to force coercion and assimilation – found here with her tale of goldfinch keepers and their desire to breed more of what nature had already created - runs front and center.

Ultimately, each film covers the exasperation and realities of the economic crisis, in incredibly human terms. Nilsen recalls an interesting historical comparison. "When we look



at Picasso's Guernica, we look at his painting about the bombing [of a town in Basque Country]. In a way, that's a painting about a particular day, in which Nazi Germany and Italian aerial legions came in and bombed Guernica. Now, we look at it, and [it's about] inhumanity, our inhumanity to other people, and how we've gone crazy with our willingness to kill each other, from above or afar.

"People may not remember the Spanish Civil War. But people remember that we have that in our souls. Picasso painted a picture of our souls. I think Gomes has done that. Seventy years from now, who the hell is going to know about the austerity program? But, through literally the lens of this artist, we'll look and see there were times when we lost our minds, in terms of our government and economics."

The trilogy could be seen as a coping mechanism for Gomes, who clearly loves his home. As a think piece, Arabian Nights places an interesting perspective on dealing with societal and economic pressures, and their natural collisions. After all, we are all just trying to understand - even if it's a bit hazardous.

Says Nilsen: "How can we digest all of the madness around us, and not go a little mad ourselves?"

#### The Sound of Silence HOME INVASION THRILLER HUSH HITS NETFLIX

Inspiration is unpredictable. One night, Hush director Mike Flanagan and star Kate Siegel were dining, discussing nontraditional heroines, home invasion movies, and their shared love of 1967's Wait Until Dark, starring Audrey Hepburn as a blind woman besieged by thieves. Then Flanagan mentioned he wanted to make a dialogue-free film. Finally, Siegel said, "I was talking about a recurring fear that I have in the house of walking past a face in the window. From there, we started bouncing back and forth on who would be someone that could turn a fairly basic premise on its head?"

That conversation became sealed-room thriller Hush, which debuted at SXSW and reaches Netflix on April 8. Maddie (Siegel) is a successful author who lost her hearing as a child. One night, a masked stranger (John Gallagher Jr.) tries to break in, with malevolent intent. But without the simple cues of hearing his footsteps, or broken glass, will she even know he's there?

With this simple idea, Flanagan and Siegel headed to the Stanley Hotel (inspiration for Stephen King's The Shining) and booked the legendarily haunted room 217: Then, Siegel said, "We drank a ton of whiskey and finished the rest of this movie."

Flanagan called those days "the weirdest writing sessions that I'd ever been a part of. Normally when you're writing with a partner, you're bouncing dialogue off each other, you're performing scenes that way. For us, we'd come in the room and we wouldn't come near the computer. I'd go outside and try to figure out how to get through the sliding glass door, and she'd be in the kitchen, trying to look for what weapons were available." The end result was a script that didn't look anything like a normal movie: Flanagan said, "It looked like a chunk of stage direction."

That doesn't mean that the film is silent. Instead, the audience is left to concentrate on the audio cues that Maddie cannot hear.



Flanagan said, "The boom operator was constantly coming around for the mic coming across the counter, or this particular footfall, or the way a door closes. They had to be catching as much of the ambient sound as possible." When there is finally an audible conversation, Flanagan said, "That was jarring for everyone on the set, to hear the spoken word again. Our boom operator was suddenly like, 'Oh, right, me.'"

And just because there was very little spoken conversation, that didn't mean there was no dialogue. Siegel had to go through a crash course in American Sign Language, which she called "a really beautiful way to communicate [and] a full, physical form of expression."

Using sign language changed how the film was shot. Flanagan said, "Typically, there are moments in there that you would go and cover in close-up, which would mean you couldn't see her hands. So the DP and I, when we went to attack that scene, it occurred to us that we were going to be in medium [shots], which is not typically how you want to cover your leading lady.'

That change was driven by Siegel's ASL coach, who explained that concentrating on Maddie's hands wasn't enough. Siegel said, "She was talking about how the sign, the actual sign, like 'no', that's barely the surface of how you would communicate. It's not just 'no,' it's what kind of 'no'? And then you have to shake your head, and you normally mouth, 'nooo,' or 'nah,' or 'no!' That kind of full body communication is expected, and the facial expressions get big. It's like dancing and talking."

## **Animated Steampunk Adventure Delights**

French film is fueled by imagination

Absolutely one of the most imaginative and altogether wonderful animated films I've had the pleasure to watch, this French import imagines an alternate reality in which electricity was never discovered and the world continued to rely on coal, and then charcoal, to provide steam-based energy. Imagine: Paris to Berlin in only 83 hours! Of course,

France and America are at war over Canada's huge swaths of still-forested land, while the rest of the world - Paris, mostly, where the film is set - is covered in soot and suffering from a collective case of black lung. (See? I told you steampunk wasn't a good idea.)

Thanks to a rip-roaringly excellent story and the film's utterly beautiful traditional

#### THE BOSS

Yay for Melissa McCarthy, one of the funniest women around, for creating a movie character that isn't based on jokes about being fat and crude. To be honest, the crude humor isn't really gone, though it's more focused than in some of her previous films, and the actress sure has a way with a one-liner. But even though McCarthy can bail herself out of any awkward silence (wittily or not), the underpinnings of The Boss are shoddy and lackluster. Co-written by McCarthy with husband and director Ben Falcone and Steve Mallory, The Boss probably would have been fired by any other employer.

Don't get me wrong: There are a lot of laughs in The Boss. The problem is that the space in between them is stagnant and shapeless. Falcone, who also directed and co-wrote Tammy, is a dud as a filmmaker. He frames shots so that you can tell with each composition where and how the inevitable joke is going to land. A couple of action sequences lack momentum, and several dialogue scenes linger as though waiting for an ad lib that never comes. Yet, some are the kind of flubs that can be fixed, or at least improved, in edit,

so it's a mystery why they weren't. Kristen Bell, as always, lends reliable support, but is given too few truly comic moments (although the bra-fitting scene provides more than ample film support). Others, like Peter Dinklage, are left to flounder, and some, like the great Kathy Bates, are absolutely wasted.

Built from a character McCarthy created while with the Groundlings improv troupe at the start of her career, the boss is a woman named Michelle Darnell (McCarthy), who is the "47th wealthiest woman in America." She apparently got to that position through cutthroat moves and foul language in which she undercut her mentor (Bates) and former paramour and rival (Dinklage). Sent to prison for insider trading, she finds she's been divested of her home and possessions when she's released five months later. Her former assistant Claire (Bell) takes her in, and when Michelle accompanies Claire's preteen daughter Rachel (Anderson) to a Dandelions meeting (modeled on the Girl Scouts), the entrepreneur sees dollar signs in the group's cookie sales. In short order and armed with Claire's brownie recipe. Darnell's Darlings hit the streets and rake in the profits. A shaggy third act delivers apologies, redemption, and an unnecessary love interest (Labine) for Claire (presumably so that we don't get any funny ideas about Claire and Michelle's partnership).

#### APRIL AND THE EXTRAORDINARY WORLD

(non-CGI, that is) animation, both tree-huggers and climate change-deniers should, for once, unite in being swept up into this fantastical, utterly mesmerizing tale.

After a concise prologue that sets the time frame and story in motion, we're introduced to plucky young April (Cotillard), the daughter of a pair of scientists who, along with Einstein, Fermi, Volta, Galvani, Faraday, and last but never least, Tesla, have been kidnapped by forces unknown, thus depriving the planet of a much-needed source of noncarbonized power. Along with her talking cat, Darwin, April ends up headquartered in the hollow steel head of the gigantic statue of Napoleon that looms over Paris, flanked by not one, but two Eiffel Towers. Adventure awaits, of course, but there's also plenty of room in this wonderfully written and extremely intelligent animated film to comment on love. loss, rampant militarism, and, zut alors!, giant talking lizards. Francophobes be warned: You miss out on this and you miss out on something entirely, amazingly original and jawdroppingly entertaining. C'est magnifique!

#### DEMOLITION

D: Jean-Marc Vallée; with Jake Gyllenhaal, Naomi Watts, Chris Cooper, Judah Lewis, Heather Lind, Polly Draper. (R, 100 min.)

Were awards to be given for the quantity of metaphors a movie puts forth, then *Demolition* might topple the record. These artificial constructs guide *Demolition*'s plot and deter the film's overall believability. This film about human emotions, and the lack thereof, stuffs its ideas into bullet-point metaphors, while forgetting that emotions are messy, unruly things that don't conform naturally to organizing principles. I might say that *Demolition* bulldozes past all that messiness, but the filmmakers insert their own bulldozer midway through the story, rendering the metaphoric literal and the literal absurd.

Even though Demolition can be deconstructed with a putty knife, there remains much to appreciate - most significantly, the central performance of Jake Gyllenhaal, who appears in virtually every scene. Gyllenhaal is Davis Mitchell, an investment banker who works in the firm of his father-in-law (Cooper), and becomes a young widower just moments into the film. For the rest of the movie, Davis is engaged in the task of coming to grips with his absence of emotion - for his dead wife, his well-appointed home, or his wellmeaning family and associates. Curiously, he becomes fixated on the malfunctioning candy machine in the ICU area of the hospital where his wife died. Out \$1.25 for a bag of M&Ms that failed to emerge when he put in his coins, Davis pens a letter about the faulty machine to the vendor's customer-service department. In the pages-long letter, he includes much personal detail about his present life. After writing four revealing letters, he receives a phone reply at 2am from the customer-service rep, Karen Moreno (Watts), who is moved by what he writes. A friendship evolves between them, as well as between Davis and Karen's adolescent son Chris (Lewis). Nothing about any of this is normal, although it is presented as such. Along the way, Davis learns that in order to reassemble his life, he must first deconstruct it - and that's where the bulldozer, the unused tool kit his father gave him, the refrigerator leak his wife (Lind, who mostly appears in vague flashbacks) had been bugging him to fix come into play. Of course, all this happens after he pulls the emergency brake on the commuter train he's on after confessing a truth to a stranger.

The screenplay by Bryan Sipe is from Figurative Writing 101, but director Jean-Marc Vallée is on a role after guiding four actors to Oscar nominations in his last two films: Reese Witherspoon and Laura Dern



in Wild, and Matthew McConaughey and Jared Leto in Dallas Buyers Club, who both won their categories. I suspect that when Demolition screened as the opening-night film at the Toronto International Film Festival last September, its distributors were testing the waters to see if they should release the film in 2015 and promote it for year-end awards. Obviously, the decision was made to release it in the spring of 2016, but that does not diminish Gyllenhaal's award-worthy performance. Indeed, Demolition scooped up an Audience Award when it played here last month at SXSW. The distinctive physicality Gyllenhaal brings to every role he plays is challenged in Demolition due to his character's dispassion, although we understand that some spark is returning to Davis' life because of Gyllenhaal's physical presentation and change - especially when he starts dancing. It's hard not to find joy in the character's rejuvenation - or renovation, to keep with the construction theme. Nevertheless. Demolition is built on a rickety foundation.

#### C HARDCORE HENRY D: Ilya Naishuller; with Sharlto Copley, Haley Bennett, Tim Roth, Darya Charusha, Danila Kozlovsky. (R, 96 min.)

So, perhaps you've heard of this film Hardcore Henry, in which case you can eschew this review and just pop on over to vour local theatre and be done with it. But for the uninitiated, Henry's evolution began when Ilya Naishuller directed a music video for his band Biting Elbows on a track called "Bad Motherfucker." That shit went viral (32 million views and counting). The clip cleverly mixed first-person perspective, elaborately choreographed parkour moves, and a knowing history of video-game culture. A subsequent Indiegogo campaign for a feature project netted \$250,000, and here we finally are, with the end result: Hardcore Henry. A narrative shot entirely in first-person, using a customized GoPro face rig, the film is an exhilarating and inventive spectacle that makes every other action film from the last 10 years look as obsolete as the Lumière brothers running that train at you back in 1896.

What's so hardcore about *Henry*? The film opens with Henry (you) waking up after being resurrected as a cyborg (with amnesia, natch), being fitted for metal limbs and reacquainting your(him)self with your wife Estelle (Bennett) before she is kidnapped by a pyscho with telekinetic powers (Kozlovsky). Your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to rescue the princess from the castle. Embracing video-game tropes outright works in *Hardcore Henry*'s favor (I'm looking at literally every other film adaptation of a video game), with nods toward ammo stashes and that character who shows up every now and then to drop some exposition. Here played by the ever pliable Sharlto Copley, he inhabits a half-dozen characters – from drug-addled hippie to right-wing mercenary – who guide Henry through his journey.

What does that look like? A glorious, bloody fucking mess, that's what. As a veteran of genre film, I've seen progressively complicated hoops that such films can find themselves jumping through, and I am here to say that there are things going on in the background of this film that could easily be a movie unto itself. *Hardcore Henry* surpasses its base gimmick to become one of the most inventive and stylish action films in recent memory (yes, I'm taking into account fucking *John Wick*). Shots fired, Hollywood.

It's something everyone can relate to: You're invited to a party you don't really want to go to, but guilt and/or obligation compels your attendance anyway. In the new thriller from Karyn Kusama (*Girlfight, Jennifer's Body*), things go from awkward to downright insane over the course of a very unsettling evening.

Still depressed from a tragedy that severed his marriage two years ago, Will (Marshall-Green) brings his new girlfriend Kira (Corinealdi) to the posh L.A. home of his ex-wife Eden (Blanchard) and her new husband David (Huisman). David and Eden have invited a number of their friends, new and old, to a party, in an attempt to end the estrangement that occurred when Eden and Will divorced. Will, returning to his old residence, is continually haunted by past events, and his memories start interfering with the already strained party atmosphere. Add to that the likelihood that David and Eden - with their new friends Sadie (Burdge) and Pruitt (Lynch) - are involved

in some sort of cult, and you have a pretty compelling concoction for some seriously unnerving tension.

There are a number of things that work in The Invitation: The cast is uniformly great (Tom Hardy - er, I mean Marshall-Green - is a standout, Lynch basically has a monopoly on the creep factor at this point in his career), and the film is elegantly shot. But when the third act reveals the film's intentions, it feels less like a procession of startling revelations and more like plot points are being crossed off a checklist. There are some very interesting ideas about grief, depression, and how we cope with life-changing events in the modern world, but ultimately, the film doesn't offer anything new to the "dinner party from hell" subgenre. This is one invite you could be forgiven for declining.

#### MY GOLDEN DAYS

You have to be very young, or very French, to pitch such grandiloquent woo as "your features contain the meaning of the world." Luckily, Arnaud Desplechin's *My Golden Days* ticks both boxes – it's about teenage first love in an industrial town in northern France.

François Truffaut made it easy for audiences by inventing an alter ego, Antoine Doinel, and linearly following him through his various stages of life. Desplechin, countryman and spiritual successor to Truffaut, is more oblique: His character Paul Dédalus first appeared in 1996's twentysomething relationship comedy My Sex Life ... Or How I Got Into an Argument, but the same name popped up 12 years later in the exquisite A Christmas Tale, attached to an unrelated character. Then again, everything is related in Desplechin's cinematic universe, which recycles names like Paul, Esther, Ivan, the surname Vuillard; also, industrial Roubaix, where Desplechin grew up; and themes of mental illness and institutionalization, the damage parents do unto children, even a guy stealing his cousin's girl. Everything isn't just related, it's relative, in that family - which a source of succor, occasionally, but mostly trauma - is essential to Desplechin's work.

Set in the late Eighties, *My* Golden Days is ostensibly a prequel to *My* Sex Life, but more so, it's in conversation with all of Desplechin's films. That's what gives this film an extra emotional heft and the fizzy disorientation of "I remember this rabbit hole." Still, prior knowledge of *My* Sex Life isn't required. (Actually, it might be a distraction, trying to square this vision of youth with what comes after.)

"I remember, I remember ...." That's how the now fully adult Paul (played by Mathieu Amalric, as in *My* Sex *Life*) introduces the film's three backward-glancing chapters, set during his childhood and teenage years. An anthropologist, Paul is returning to Paris after years abroad, a move which revives his memories – of a turbulent relationship with

his mother; of an escapade in Minsk, as a teenage secret agent; and of his pursuit – as a gawky, lovestruck 19-year-old – of Esther, all sleepy-lidded, kissable-mouth gorgeous, and way out of his league. The teenage Paul and Esther are played by Quentin Dolmaire and Lou Roy-Lecollinet – first-time actors, improbably. You can't tear your eyes off them.

These "Golden Days" are from Paul's perspective – his framing device, his defining events, his narration explaining how he goes to Paris to study while the still-provincial Esther is left home to pine. That power shift is ruinous. Early in their courtship, when he's still chasing her, he asks-slash-pledges. "Have you ever been loved more than life? It's how I'll love you." For Esther - convinced her worth lies in her beauty - the violence of his love is her undoing. Middle-aged Paul, still inflamed with the memory of Esther, gets an epilogue, but she does not. Still, the youthful Esther gets the final frame. Naked and relaxed, having just translated Greek for her lover - she was always smarter than he gave her credit for - she stares the screen down, chin up, like a dare. Maybe a dare to Desplechin, in fact: Next time, more Esther, less Paul. She's still got stories to be told. - Kimberlev Jones \*\*\*\* ARBOR

Honestly, Snyder's seriously patience-trying Sturm und Drang signifies, well, nothing much, apart from the dawn of the forthcoming Justice League - DC's answer to Marvel Studios' Avengers franchise. Granted, there are enough finely choreographed action set-pieces here to fill five other movies, and it's a kick to see Bruce Wavne saddled under a costume that appears to have been manufactured from a tank. But Batman v Superman lacks the Marvel Universe's sense of snarky reality and outsider empathy, and Snyder has crammed just too much of a great thing into his film, resulting in a super-slog that has just too much of everything. 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


#### C EVERYBODY WANTS SOME!!

There's hardly a plot to speak of: Much of the film is viewed through the eyes of freshman pitcher Jake (Jenner), who arrives at his small Texas college and immediately provokes friendly scorn from his new teammates, among them team captain McReynolds (Hoechlin), ladies' man Finnegan (Powell), and dope-addled elder statesman Willoughby (Russell). Breezily funny and dead-on accurate in its beery-horny pace, Everybody Wants Some !! is Linklater at his best, recalling the relatively recent past intimately and with obvious affection. I Saw the Light is dramatically inert, reworking the same basic story again and again: Get sloppy drunk, get to the next gig and perform beautifully (if he shows up at all), fight with Audrey or his enabling mother (Jones), sleep it off, and get up and do it all over again. While British actor Hiddleston transcendently captures the sound of Williams' voice and his performative swagger, the film offers no insight into Williams' artistic genius or his pivotal position in the history of American popular music. An 8-year-old boy reportedly abducted in Texas, Alton (Lieberher) sits nevertheless unperturbed in a motel room - cross-legged, reading a comic book under a blanket by flashlight, with goggles covering his eyes - as two men, Roy (Shannon) and Lucas (Edgerton), black out the room's window. Elsewhere, a congregation (headed by Sam Shepard) rues the absence of their boy prophet, who delivered to them unintelligible, number-based scriptures in tongues. Soon, the federal government is searching for Alton, too, claiming he poses a threat to national security. Is the boy a savior or weapon? There's a certain spiritualism that inhabits all of Nichols' films, and while I'm not sure that the final explanations offered here are truly sufficient, in the context of the movie, it all works. Aside from the physical and emotional anguish Anna suffers, her infirmity takes its toll on her parents and siblings as well: marital discord, maxed-out credit cards, the everyday stress about what tomorrow might bring. As the spiritually distressed Christy, Garner gives an earnest performance, but the film never allows her to truly plumb the depth of her character's despair. Set during the 1820s in the unsettled American West, Iñárritu's film (based on the novel by Michael Punke) finds Glass on a slow death crawl toward recovery and revenge, after being left for dead by two trappers, John Fitzgerald (Hardy) and Jim Bridger (Poulter), without provisions, weapons - or his mixed-heritage son Hawk (Goodluck). DiCaprio is always fully engaging to watch, but at 156 minutes, Iñárritu's film seems like there could have been room for thematic flourishes more provocative than basic survival and revenge. 

## Welcome to Terrordome: Sixth Street During SXSW

Last Saturday night on Sixth Street, closing time: Local wisdom cautions you to avoid "Dirty Sixth" during **Texas Relays**, a track and field summit drawing a largely African-American crowd to the city's entertainment district, but I've been here all night and no one's picked my pocket, tried to sell me Molly, nor have I witnessed a single fight. Police officers leaning on orange and white crowd-control barriers look a little bored.

Compare that to the havoc of two weeks prior, on the final night of **South by Southwest**: A barricaded police lane in the center of the street pushes crowds to the side and creates a human traffic jam.

Loiterers start fights and sell drugs, and a stampede ensues after a 22-year-old Killeen resident fires warning shots into the sky after an argument. No wonder

APD Assistant Chief Chris McIlvain calls Sixth Street during the Festival a "challenging environment for public safety."

Others call it bad for business.

A source at SXSW says that Saturday door totals for their venues on the local equivalent to New Orleans' Bourbon Street came in at one-third of the previous year's numbers, and that Friday was down as well. Bartenders up and down the street confirm that they netted significantly less tips over the last two Festivals. That's because the real party is *in* the street, which compelled APD to erect a roughly 20-foot-wide open artery in the center of Sixth during SXSW.

Rather than allowing space for emergency or official use vehicles, the lane, which debuted last Halloween, helps officers manage the crowd, according to McIlvain.

"It really comes down to officer safety," he says. "It creates a safe zone where we can more effectively view and manage the crowd and not be completely surrounded at all times. When you don't have that, it becomes so dense that it's hard to even keep track of your fellow officers, and they're pushed to the walls."

**Bob Woody**, a major Sixth Street stakeholder whose bars include **Shakespeare's Pub**, the **Blind Pig**, and **Coppertank**, believes the barricade configuration contributed to the air of hostility on Sixth during SXSW.

"It makes the street more crowded and creates pinch points," he offers. "When you inhibit people's possession of space, that's when things get bad." McIlvain expects APD to repeat the barricade during next year's SXSW.

"If that means we have a little backed-up foot traffic, we know and anticipate that, but it's part of dealing with the overall situation," he explains.

Local garage-blues duo the **Ghost Wolves** canceled a Saturday night SXSW show at **B.D. Riley's** due to the chaos on Sixth. The band's sound engineer, **Joe Ben Clark**, says that he and drummer **Jonathan Wolf** parked the van and sojourned down Sixth at 7pm to check

out the bar and load in for their 10pm set. "The energy was so negative down there. The street was full of people who were angry


and all you could hear was 'Molly! Bars! Weed! Ecstasy!'" he recalls. "You'd be checking your wallet to see if you got skimmed yet. It was hard to even walk to the bar, so the band made the decision to cancel."

McIlvain says APD made at least 29 narcotics-related arrests on or near Sixth

Street between March 11 and March 20. In addition to APD's "eye in the sky," SXSW also has cameras trained on the thoroughfare.

"We have a command center and we see people constantly dealing drugs," confirmed the SXSW source.

Veteran Austinites may remember a time when SXSW was condemned for being too white. Now it's criticized for being a lighthouse for hip-hop devotees. Like Miami's Urban Beach Week, another spring gathering where minorities become the majority, it exposes the racial attitudes of locals.



During a casual conversation, I asked one local businessman who co-owns multiple bars on Sixth, "How was SXSW for you?"

"Too many niggers," he replied, not knowing I'm a reporter, then threatened to sue me if quoted.

The shifting of racial demographics amongst those who visit Austin during the Festival is widely attributed to SXSW booking more hip-hop, but ancillary events like **Fader Fort**, which has presented both **Kanye West** and, this year, **Drake**, and Vevo's 2011 takeover of the **Seaholm Power Plant** with West and **Jay Z**, have conditioned fans of hip-hop to come from all over the state to SXSW sans wristband with the expectation of seeing major rappers for free.

Bob Woody, whose Coppertank is a major Downtown venue at SXSW, says the buck stops with the Festival.

"SXSW needs to take all responsibility for anything that happens inside the enclosure because the reason the street is shut down all day is for the crowds expected for their event," he says. "Even the barrier lane is SXSW's fault because they didn't present a better idea to the police department."

SXSW sees the lawless atmosphere of Sixth Street as a year-round concern.

"We're not going to be able to solve the problems of Sixth Street during SXSW if we don't solve it the rest of the year on weekends," maintains our source. "I think the only solution is to stop closing the street year-round."

Opening the entertainment district to cars Thursday through Saturday nights isn't as counterintuitive as it sounds. In 2005, Tampa officials attempted to clean up crime in Ybor City's Seventh Avenue party strip by opening it up to vehicles on the weekend and, thus, eliminating the party-in-the-street mentality. The following year, a group comprised of APD staff and Pecan Street Owners Association members visited Ybor City and wrote in their report that, "Opening to cars eliminated the 'Wild West' atmosphere." Crime dropped 20% in the first year. Our source noted that it'd require widening sidewalks and removing parking spaces for that to work on Sixth.


Woody disagrees, saying the traffic closure on Sixth is a necessity and there would be safety issues if it were opened up to cars. He has his own suggestion for a way to tamp down the street party during SXSW.

"I'd have no problem with taking underage people off these streets – gating the crowd, getting IDs checked and backpacks looked at, and enforcing the curfew," he says, referring to the 11pm juvenile curfew for Sixth Street that APD doesn't actively enforce. "I think it would take 15-20% of the crowd away, and I'm fine with that because it's only taking the possibility of a noncustomer out of the equation."

#### HALF NOTES

**EXPLOSIONS IN THE SKY** played an intimate set at **End of an Ear** last Friday. "It's been 16 years since we've played an in-store," confirmed guitarist **Munaf Rayani**. The homegrown instrumental quintet levitated five songs from eclectic new LP *The Wilderness* (see "Texas Platters," p.54), peaking with heavy exploration "Disintegration Anxiety." Afterward, Rayani requested applause for End of an Ear, saying, "We're lucky to have a record store like this in Austin." Earlier that week, after a worker at adjoining retailer **New Brohemia** told "Playback" the building had been sold and was slated for demolition, End of an Ear owner **Dan Plunkett** offered no comment on whether his beloved record emporium would relocate, but downplayed the situation's severity, saying nothing is happening right now.

**ASLEEP AT THE WHEEL** has weathered its 1,000th personnel change with pianist/ singer **Emily Gimble** leaving the landmark swing act after two years to focus on her solo career. The band's management is staying mum on her replacement, but it's clear that deluxe pianist **Connor Forsyth** will tickle their keys for the time being.

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#### Magic Kic Hayes Carll trades in his drunken poet's dream

Hayes Carll looks worried.

The songwriter stares toward the back of the Little Longhorn Saloon, where the door stands open to a gray day spitting rain. In an hour, friends and their families will start arriving at the small Burnet Road honky-tonk for the finale of a video for his new song, "The Magic Kid." Today's shoot calls for a barbecue scene in the parking lot, but the weather is forcing some improvisation.

Carll's piercing blue eyes tint darker as he steps outside to smoke a cigarette and ponder the clouds. For the past half hour, he's been sitting on a stool in the corner of the bar, strumming his guitar to a recording of the song as the crew films different takes. Leaden skies match the nostalgic melancholy and earnest wonder of the song.

Pick a card, any card Don't show it to me Abracadabra I've got nothin' up my sleeve And I may get it wrong or get it right But either way I'm standing in the light Where nothing is hid I'm the magic kid

The 12-year-old working the bar with card tricks, Eli Carll, demonstrates the natural showmanship of his father, and the same drowsy but penetrating eyes, only darker. The two used to team up on South Congress, one performing street magic and the other busking. Now, Eli sets up at the merch table and does sleights of hand for onlookers.

"What was interesting to me was that when he failed, when he didn't pull off the trick, he was completely undeterred," marvels Hayes. "I don't know that I've ever had that fortitude. What I saw in him was this fearlessness and determination to be what he was, and not an ounce of consideration for anything else. How amazing is that, for him, or anyone, to get through childhood and be unique and be themselves and not conform to what everybody else is?

"I wanted to capture that, and just let him know, too, that I saw it and that I was proud of it, and try to reinforce that's not something you have to give up. This life's not going to be easy, and there are going to be a lot of times where you just want to take the easy path and be what everybody wants you to be and let go of yourself in the process."

"The Magic Kid" represents a new perspective for Carll. Despite the success of his fourth album, 2011's *KMAG YOYO* (& *Other American Stories*), Carll found himself at the crossroads of a career and life he had built. As he graduated to larger stages, constant touring and living up to his self-cultivated image of drunken poet troubadour took their toll.

Carll turned 40 in January. He and his wife divorced after being together since college. The label that released his previous two albums to widespread acclaim folded. Now, after a five-year wait, *Lovers and Leavers* delivers a startlingly personal set of songs, powerfully stripped back from the raucous, clever narratives that have been Carll's hallmark.

Outside the club, the dreary weather finally begins to break, his friends arriving and the bar filling with kids. Eli sits cross-

legged on the stage, and the camera zooms in to catch his hands flipping through a deck of cards as "The Magic Kid" plays once more. Carll watches over his son's shoulder, the earlier look of professional concern ceding to paternal protectiveness. A slight, crooked smile breaks across his face as Eli flicks a

card directly at the camera lens and lands the perfect final shot.

#### **DRUNKEN POET'S DREAM**

Raised in the Houston suburbs, where both his parents worked as attorneys, Carll lit out on his own path after college. He set up along the shores of Crystal Beach, playing roughneck bars and honing his songwriting. "There was an ocean and a gig, and that's what I was looking for at the time – just some life experience to write about and a good place to do it and go practice every night," he told the *Chronicle* almost a decade ago (revisit "Trouble in Mind," June 6, 2008).

After scoring a job at storied venue the Old Quarter, Carll made connections opening for legendary songwriters passing through. He particularly impressed Ray Wylie Hubbard and Guy Clark, both of whom he wrote with for 2005 sophomore LP *Little Rock*. A Hubbard collaboration also kicked off Carll's 2008 Lost Highway debut, *Trouble in Mind*, the picaresque "Drunken Poet's Dream" still a favorite of both musicians' live sets. The album captured Carll's roguish yet sensitive sensibility, narratives excavated from his beach bar days and delivered with wry rhymes and easy melodies.

Three years later, follow-up *KMAG* YOYO (Kiss My Ass Guys You're On Your Own), a rousing stomp and holler, showcased Carll at his most bitingly satirical and earned him an Artist of the Year nomination from the Americana Music Honors & Awards. The wrenching "Chances Are" garnered a 2016 Grammy nod for Best Country Song via Lee Ann Womack's cover. *KMAG* also launched him at festivals, unloading beer-raising anthems to ever more fervent crowds.

"I love seeing thousands of people just going nuts and singing along, but I never really expected that to be my thing," he admits. "I can't say I've ever been super comfortable as a frontman in that environment. I think that's why I drank so much for so long – that insecurity onstage. I didn't have faith that people would like me for being me, so I had to assume some kind of character. The drunken, rambling, goodtime poet was that character, capable of moments of depth and sincerity, but it's hard to be vulnerable in life and onstage.

"As a result, I felt I had never quite gotten to where I wanted to be as an artist."

> Tours and crowds increasing, so too did Carll's realization that he wasn't just missing moments of his son's life, but entire seasons.

"At a certain point it became clear to me that this wasn't as rewarding as it once was and wasn't the life I wanted," offers Carll candidly. "I was trying to be everything to everyone and I lost myself a little bit. The years started

going by quicker and quicker, and I realized there were a lot of things I wasn't happy with, and that I could close my eyes and go right back into what I was doing, and another 10 years would go by. If I wanted to live the life I wanted, I needed to figure out the kind of life I wanted.

"My personal life kind of unraveling definitely made me become aware of what I had and didn't have."

#### THE LOVE THAT WE NEED

Lovers and Leavers echoes 2002 Carll debut Flowers and Liquor in title, but from the road weariness of "Drive" and letting go of "Good While It Lasted" to the unvarnished pleading of "Love Don't Let Me Down," the new album's sparseness unfolds with a naked directness.

"It's a questioning record," allows its author. "I'm not giving any answers because I don't have any to give. That's where I am in life, which is pretty thick in the process of just trying to figure it out. The songs are reflective of that. I'm searching, these characters are searching."

The album also represents an exercise in trust for Carll. He handed over production almost completely to master song stylist/producer/artist-in-his-own-right Joe Henry. Every song is also a co-write with seasoned pros like J.D. Souther and Jim Lauderdale, including "The Love That We Need," written with new girlfriend Allison Moorer and Jack Ingram.

"I have my tricks and my style, but writing with people helps me open up and be honest and say what I mean," he offers. "You build up habits you're not aware of sometimes, like I want to fill every space with sound, with a lyric. I'm really reluctant to have open space. It feels vulnerable to me, like I'm losing control in some way.

"But it doesn't always have to be clever," continues Carll. "You can say, 'I'm hurting,' and you can do that in a creative, artistic way that's even more powerful than couching it in riddles. That was eye-opening to me. This was a way of communicating for me that was exactly how I wanted it to be."

He also voices belief in his fan base following him to a more intimate destination on *Lovers and Leavers*.

"I think people appreciate authenticity and are hungry for that," he says. "They're looking for somebody that's original and true and honest in telling their story. I always want my music to connect with people, but this is the first time where I did what I needed to do creatively, and I didn't let those fears about anything stop me.

"This job is too great and I'm too lucky to do this and have an audience not to be happy doing it. Feeling like I was doing the same thing every night was not going to leave me in a good place. So now is the time. I have this opportunity to go in a different direction, and I might lose some people in the process, but hopefully I'll pick up some people as well. That's the evolution of a career.

"I had to let go of my fears of people not liking it."

Last month at SXSW, Carll put the new songs to the test across eight shows in four days. For his official Thursday night showcase at the Gatsby, he emerged with only guitar and drums backing. The crowd roused predictably for "KMAG YOYO," but soon enough, Carll changed gears.

"Most of my songs are about drinking and women, and drunk women," he laughs from the stage. "This is my first song about my son."

This world can be so full of darkness And blown out flames

Trading dreams for pecking orders And school yard games

But you shine your light for everyone to see The only one I've known who's truly free

Yeah, you just are what you will always be You're the magic kid

Against the blaring din of SXSW, with eyes closed, Carll softly closes out the song. When he opens them, the crowd is hushed and then erupts in approval. In that moment, he's experienced something even more powerful than leading thousands of fans in rowdy sing-alongs: the ability to silence a room with a song.

#### HAYES CARLL Lovers and Leavers (Hwy 87/Thirty Tigers)

Lovers and Leavers isn't an anomaly. Lone Star codification opens Hayes Carll's 2002 debut Flowers and Liquor, a jaunty drawl befitting Ray Wylie Hubbard on "Highway 87" (see label above) and "Naked Checkers" stripping down to its Lyle Lovett. That fan appreciation resulted in the former outlaw's penmanship on the succeeding *Little Rock* ("Chickens") and a co-write by Guy Clark ("Rivertown"). *Trouble in Mind* completes the mentor/protégé cycle in Hubbard/Carll hit "Drunken Poet's Dream," but Steve Earle starkness ("Don't Let Me Fall") bleeds Dylan-esque ("A Lover Like You") on the way to a Tom Waits cover ("I Don't Wanna Grow Up") – song apprenticeships still. By

*KMAG YOYO* in 2011, integration's complete even if the joke's gone too far ("Another Like You"), yet Carll's also perfected his first-day country-folk into pure Mark Twain ("The Letter"). *Lovers and Leavers* pays off its predecessor's bar tab by shucking off all but the sonic essentials, not naked so much as modest. Quiet. Drums, bass, and piano pulse miles below the steel strum of an acoustic guitar and the singer's plaintive twang on "Good While It Lasted." Pace car "Drive," co-written with Jim Lauderdale, moves at the speed of human blindness ("Shooting star, racing through the night/ As long as you keep moving, you won't ever die"), but does so at an on-foot tempo. A *Flowers and Liquor*-style homage to Townes Van Zandt whips up the snappy faux noir of "Sake of the Song," a Carll classic only half as landmark as the balladic brushstrokes stirring Tom Petty's Southern accents on "The Love That We Need." In this context, consider organ-hummed ditty "Love Is So Easy" comic relief. *Lovers and Leavers*, Hayes Carll assimilated.





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#### **EXPLOSIONS** IN THE SKY The Wilderness (Temporary Residence Ltd.)

The Wilderness opens quietly, like early morning light, a mother's gentle hand rocking you awake in a childhood bedroom - sleepy, muffled first moments that are new but somehow familiar. Austin's Explosions in the Sky have mastered that feeling dozens of times over across their 17-year career. Tapping into visceral moments of humanity through cinematic instrumentals, the local quartet has spent its vaunted discography constructing expansive, emotional soundscapes. Their seventh album is no different: textured, ornate, and somehow seeping into the deepest parts of you. Notch it as the best Explosions in the Sky album since their previous high-water mark, 2003's The Earth Is Not a Cold Dead Place.

Despite a more meditative and succinct approach to storytelling - the longest track clocks in at just over seven minutes – The Wilderness affirms that no one else knows how to build a song like EITS. "Logic of a Dream" unfurls with an unpredictable trajectory, encompassing both a frightening, dark cacophony and the sweet relief that comes after trauma has passed. "Disintegration Anxiety" comes on like a panic attack, while "Losing the Light" is a spacey, meandering sprawl, the sound of bleeding out. Breaking through after two-and-a-half minutes of uneasiness, "Tangle Formations" becomes a triumphant cadence. Along with a pervasive uncertainty endemic to all the group's work, there's trademark hopefulness strung throughout, fighting to prevail.

Poetic song titles always anchor the work in a tangible place, guiding the narrative unfolding in their instrumental excursions, like earlier works "First Breath After Coma" and "Your Hand in Mine." Here, Explosions in the Sky don't yearn to be anchored at all, instead building their sound in an atmospheric, galactic place - unexplored terrain, a wilderness indeed. \*\*\*\*\* - Libby Webster



#### CHERUBS Fist in the Air (Brutal Panda)

Girded by a primitive, Thomas organstyle percussion loop, the title track of this spirited five-song EP yields the most

hook-laden track Cherubs have unleashed since their depraved 1993 cover of Blondie's "Dreaming." Submerged just beneath the cacophonous rubble is a lo-fi stoner pop anthem that pitches and yaws its way into the subconscious. "Donkey Suite" locks in a grizzled spiral of distressed noise punctuated by guitarist/vocalist Kevin Whitley's high-pitched yowl, while "Red Carpet Blues" drives headlong into pitch-shifted oblivion. Shit & Shine and Les Savy Fav's Tim Harrington contributes remixes of "Fist in the Air." The former slows the tune down against a harrowing slurry of underwater noise. The latter alternates synthetic beats and full-bore distortion. Fist in the Air proves succinct but potent evidence that last year's 2 Ynfynyty, first Cherubs LP in more than two decades, was no fluke. \*\*\*

#### THE GLENN REXACH GROUP PanaRican Austin Strat

cat Glenn Rexach eschews rock and blues flamboyance

for jazz virtuosity on third album PanaRican. The Austin School of Music instructor and accompanists Aaron Hatmaker (bass) and Kevin Scott (drums) hit right out of the gate with "Flex Time," a bluesy funk bopper that wouldn't sound out of place on an early John Scofield LP. Favoring clean tones and

a subtle R&B feel, the band soars through "Soul Stretch," and fuzz colors molten soloing on the friendly fusion of "Angst Freedom Rider." Rexach also turns 250-year-old hymn "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" into a lush jazz ballad. The epic "Barbacoa Reverie" starts out bossa nova before ramping up to a polyrhythmic display of dazzling group interplay. Despite his impressive skill, Rexach rarely descends into self-indulgence, utilizing his technique without being excessive. Taste gives PanaRican an accessible lift most fusioneers never accomplish. – Michael Toland \*\*\*

eponymous 2014 debut. Intending to record another studio LP, the Boxing Lesson offshoot instead followed its instincts, Paul Waclawsky, Jaylinn Davidson, Katey Gunn, and Jake Mitchell turning to wordless improvisational soundscapes recorded at home. Armed with an impressive collection of analog synths, the band journeys to a distant musical planet. The guitar-driven "Holocene Dream" indicates takeoff, "Cosmic Spaghetti" the flight, and "Brinca! Brinca!" the landing. Then it's time to explore this new world. Traversing the barren landscapes of "Cosmic Jokers," our intrepid locals hit alien civilization via the title track. "Future Passed" follows our travelers back to their ship, and "Little Lids" finds them once more in the void, contemplating all they've seen. Though a sidestep from the whimsical psych-pop of the debut, Pink Panther is even stronger, an organic trip into the cosmic ether. \*\*\*\* – Michael Toland

#### DANA FALCONBERRY & MEDICINE BOW From the Forest Came the Fire (Modern Outsider)

While Dana Falconberry's stunning 2012 LP Leelanau sounded like the last day of summer camp, follow-up From the Forest Came the Fire arrives as a moonlight walk through the woods with a backpack full of crystals. Consider it a conceptual step for the Austin songwriter, who boasts a voice like a bird call and a lyrical knack for interweaving pastoral observations with real emotion and the metaphysical magic of nature. "If my bones are branches/ Be them snarled and swayed/ You can gather me like kindling/ I will not be afraid,"



Falconberry whispers in "Alamogordo," stoking a blue flame forest fire of bravery and mortality. Accompanying Falconberry's supernatural quest is a sonic transition from rustic chamber pop to avant-garde indie folk. Gorgeous single "Cormorant," which melodically jumps like crickets and lights like fireflies, stands as an outlier to an overall solemn tone. It's a sound that finds enchantment on spiritual rebirth "Dolomite," but becomes monotonous as the disc progresses into a slower second half that wears thin as progressively less enchanted trio "Oxheart," "Leona," and "Powerlines" kill time until "Alamogordo." Brilliant lyricism doesn't make up for the fact that darkness isn't Dana Falconberry's forte. \*\*\*

LUKAS **NELSON &** PROMISE OF THE REAL Something Real (Royal Potato Family) WILLIE NELSON

Summertime: Willie Nelson Sings Gershwin (Legacy)

Famed father and rising son issue new LPs practically within seconds of one another. Any common ground - other than DNA? Uncanny vocal resemblance to papa, Lukas Nelson's been scything his own path in rock's overgrown backyard. Pruning the weeds to create psychedelic blues/jam rock, junior's third LP yields epic riffery in "Surprise" and the title track: "I want to see you get mad, I want to see you crying," he hectors a faithless lover. "Give me something real!" There's also dark country rock on "Set Me Down on a Cloud," and a revealed connection between performing the chestnut "Georgia on My Mind" onstage with Willie and the haunting of Lukas' mind by a young lady also named "Georgia."

Willie, meantime, returns once more to the American songbook he so brilliantly embraced with his aforementioned crossplatform hit and accompanying Stardust LP. Now, the Red-Headed Stranger applies his touch to a sole composer, the imminently witty and erudite George Gershwin. The tack Willie & Family take with gold like "Someone to Watch Over Me," "Let's Call the Whole Thing Off," and "I Got Rhythm" could be dubbed cowboy cocktail jazz. Brushed drums, sister Bobbie Nelson's articulate piano, stand-up bass, Mickey Raphael's melancholy harmonica, the occasional dollop of steel guitar, and the bandleader's patented gypsy jazz guitaristics and well-seasoned voice embrace some of the most intelligently crafted lyrics written. File among your midnight listens.

Something Real reveals the link: Lukas inherited Willie's deft interpretive skills, via, of all things, 1967 Scott McKenzie Haight-Ashbury cash-in, "San Francisco." Rick Miller started Southern Culture on the Skids in mid-Eighties Chapel Hill, N.C., as a fourpiece with revolving personnel. Almost 30 years ago, the current trio of Mary Huff on bass and vocals, and Dave Hartman on drums, solidified into SCOTS, a band known for melding two types of Southern-fried: twisted rockabilly and chicken.

Singer/guitarist Miller partially attributes that longevity to the group's ability to have a good time.

"The other part of it," he says, "is that we've always been a do-it-yourself type of band. Even when we were on a major label, we made our own records and made our own choices. So even if we made a bad move, the only people we could blame is ourselves. I think that's got a lot to do with it.

EUPHORIA FEST Carson Creek Ranch, Thursday 7 - Sunday 10

Ten thousand bass-hungry vibe chasers flock to the fifth installment of Euphoria Fest. #### **MY RELATIVE DIED WITH** A WILL - WHAT NEXT?

A relative passed away recently and the duty has fallen to me to wind up his affairs. He left a will. Where do I start? Can I do this without a lawyer?

Coping with a death in the family is a difficult process. First, see to your own and your loved ones' grief before worrying about the "stuff," After emotions have subsided, however, it is wise to consider transferring your relative's property to those who are entitled to it in a fashion that will minimize the danger of legal problems in the future. Don't wait too long - things will generally be much simpler if you act within months, not years.

Second, determine if the deceased left a will. If so, it must be filed with the proper county court, usually that of the county in which the deceased was domiciled when he died. Even if you think that there is no need to probate the will, the law requires that it at least be filed. Filing the will does not necessarily mean you will have to go through all the formalities of probate; it merely makes the decedent's will part of the county's records.

Third, determine what options the law offers you. One of the "shortcuts" Texas law offers is to apply to probate the will as a "muniment" (meaning literally, "defense") of title only. If there are no debts other than those secured by a lien on real estate (e.g., a mortgage), then the distributees may simply present the will, along with the order admitting it to probate, as proof of the transfer of title of all the decedent's property to the distributees named in the will. In some instances, the probate court will allow you to proceed without an attorney when probating a will as a muniment of title, but be prepared to spend time finding the correct forms and including the signatures of all the distributees under the will on the application. You can find forms to apply to "prove up" a will as a muniment of title in the library on the fourth floor of the Travis County Courthouse, but you may want to check with the court first to see if it will allow you to proceed without a lawyer.

Finally, even if the deceased's estate meets the conditions for probate as a muniment of title, it is always safest to seek the advice of an attorney before proceeding.
