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It is the Worst of Times, It is the Worst of Times

It is the age of little wisdom, it is the age of foolishness

We are living in strange times, the most exaggerated and distorted of my life. Much of this is due to President Trump, not just the least qualified person to ever hold that office but one whose track record, beliefs, and actions are both astonishingly obvious yet viewed radically differently by different segments of citizens. Obviously you could accurately argue that this has always been the case, Americans in disagreement with each other. But we have entered a time where there is no common ground, no shared space. The inclination of most seems to be to further retreat into tribalism, embracing the political clan they find most soothing and unchallenging.

On all sides, compromise is not just undesired, but despicable. To compromise is to surrender and capitulate, to fail the present and sell out the future. This attitude is shared as much by liberals as conservatives, by the more progressive left as well as the proudly reactionary right.

OK, this is a column of opinion. I'm not going to put "I think" in front of every statement; that is implied. This column offers a

catalog of generalities. All are to some degree accurate, all boast flaws in logic and inclusion. This is a report from the front, not a detailed, annotated history.

It is a listing of things (truths, opinions, thoughts) that I hold to be self-evident (suggested, possible). This is part one. Overall it will be as depressing a take on where we are and may be

going as I have ever offered, because never before has my despair been so deep and my belief in this country so shaken.

There is no evident significant difference between the ideology, methodology, and

ambitions of the extreme Christian fundamentalist right and the Muslim absolute jihadists. Each side is certain that their religious view is the truth, as certain that

> the ones held by the other are wrong, while convinced that working toward their logical vision of the future. the other side wants to wipe them out.

> Neither evidence any love of God or belief in humanity but rather use scripture and deity as a way to justify repression, intolerance, and exclusion, all draped in a holier-


than-thou sanctimony.

The abandonment of the Constitution as a guiding document, as well, seems to be subscribed to by folks of all ideological stripes. Coming together to work in unity for the shared interests of all is treated as either naive, ignorant, subversive, or purposefully extremist.

There is little difference between the overly violent sectarian left (witness last issue's article on the Red Guards) and the equally isolationist reactionary right. Neither care about a democratic republic or have any interest in a society espousing and supporting shared respect, attempted understanding, and an ongoing effort to accommodate the views of others.

A member of the Red Guards was quoted last issue as saying, "We believe in armed struggle with mass participation." Recently, folks dressed in fatigues holding automatic weapons appeared in public to protect the rights of citizens supporting Trump. Neither group cares for the Constitution, the functioning structure of a democratic republic or the actual desires and interests of the majority of citizens. Both manifest a thin

ideology that owes more to comic books than news reports, more to the narrative structure and ideology of B Westerns (Good Guys vs. Bad Guys) than Marxist treatises or the vision of the Founding Fathers.

Both left and right are sure they know what is best for all; neither really needs or wants the weigh-in of the masses. When a significant part of the population seems to hold opposing views they blame misinformation, media lying, or personal motivations (all kinds of variants on "love it or leave it"). Gleefully, the right supports voter suppression, denial of citizenship, and aggressive gerrymandering - not so all citizens can better share in governing but to maintain the power of a party with ever narrowing views. Championing universal human rights while chanting "The People United Will Never Be Defeated," the left, especially the extreme left, seems to ignore the clear desire of most individuals for decent housing, good education for their kids, and good jobs. In a frenzy of Marxist fantasies they ignore the reality of Wal-Mart and cable TV. Insisting these are narcotics to which the masses are intentionally addicted to prevent the people's revolution, they miss that these actually are the people's revolution.

"Fake news" and "biased media" are the terms used by most to describe the media presenting news they don't want to hear. After the longest time ranting against the liberal bias of mainstream media, the conservative right made clear the issue was not with bias dictating content but the nature of that bias as they embraced Fox and Breitbart. On the other hand, the left, ranging from those opposed to the dominance of international corporations to many who distrust anything official to the conspiracytheorist fringes entertaining lunatic theories, have never had any truck with mainstream media.

We no longer even vaguely share a common source's take on the world around us.

The greatest concern as to the future of this country is the ongoing working-class support and in some cases love of President Trump. Ignoring his history, business track record, what he has said and is doing, they insist on his having a deep sense of Americanism and a profound affection for most Americans that his extreme narcissism does not allow and probably can't even begin to understand.

It does seem like the mass of Trump supporters are enthralled by and enthusiastically support a government and a vision that is pretty much the opposite of what they insist. Wearily, with an East Coast intellectual's arrogance, I find it too painful to watch so much of the populace cheering on an assault on their own best interests and supporting a legislative vision that aggressively yet smugly limits their constitutional rights and actively destroys their hard-fought and longcherished protections.

NO REGULAR CITY COUNCIL meeting this week, although members received an update briefing on CodeNEXT Wednesday afternoon ("zoning and process regulations"), and some are busy with public events. The next regular meeting, Thursday, March 2, will include a heavy zoning agenda, including the return of the Austin Oaks PUD.

A HISTORIC SETTLEMENT last week: Council approved a \$3.25 million settlement with the family of **David Joseph** on Thursday. In turn, Joseph's family has agreed to cease any other legal efforts against the city. The 17-year-old was shot and killed by former APD officer Geoffrey Freeman last February.

NORMA McCORVEY, THE "ROE" in the historic 1973 U.S. Supreme Court case Roe v. Wade, died of heart failure on Saturday at an assisted living center in Katy. McCorvey, who in 1969 sought an abortion in Texas, served as the anonymous plaintiff in the landmark case legalizing the medical procedure, yet later in life underwent a religious conversion and became an anti-choice activist.

LIFESTYLE OVER LONG-FORM? A

Monday story from the Columbia Journalism Review suggested that Texas Monthly may be headed in a new direction under new Editor-in-Chief Tim Taliaferro - one built on lifestyle stories and coverage of live events instead of political reporting and long-form journalism. "Texans don't care about politics," the CJR quoted Taliaferro. In a tweet, the 33-year-old EIC said that quote was "taken so far out of context." He disputed much of the article's sentiment in an editor's note published Tuesday.

RICHARD LINKLATER and GSD&M are behind a new digital ad released by the ACLU of Texas and Legacy Community Health that exposes the bigotry of SB 6, Texas' anti-trans bathroom bill. The comical "I Pee With LGBT" ad - featuring two transgender Texans and others using the restroom - reminds that the bill isn't as much about privacy as it is about discrimination. SEVERE STORMS SWEPT through Austin overnight Sunday, spawning several tornadoes and leaving 30,000 people temporarily without power.

MAYOR STEVE ADLER was one of many mayors across the country who, on Wednesday, participated in a National Day of Action to protect the Affordable Care Act. If Congress follows through with their threat to repeal the ACA, 168,000 Travis County residents will be left without health insurance.

GARY CARTWRIGHT, a Texas Monthly writer and editor for nearly 40 years, died Wednesday morning. He was 82.



What We Think of Us

CITY'S "COMMUNITY SURVEY" AN ANNUAL PUBLIC SELFIE

We love Austin. We believe Austin is a least 200 surveys in each of the 10 City great place to live and work, and an excellent place to raise children. We're fairly keen on the overall quality of city services,

and those of us getting on in years are mostly persuaded Austin will be a good place to retire. On the other hand, we're not quite convinced we're getting fair value for what we're paying in taxes and fees. And we're deeply disappointed in the city's willingness or ability in "planning for growth."

Those conclusions are drawn from the City of

Austin's latest "Community Survey," this one performed by the ETC Institute (a market research firm that specializes in these types of governmental surveys), and based on 2,099 completed mail, phone, and internet questionnaires of Austin residents, at Council districts, a sample of city demographics roughly representative in race, gender, age, and income (and delivering

> perhaps surprisingly similar results citywide). The surveyors grade themselves at a "confidence level" of 95%, and a margin of error of +/-2.1% (i.e., pretty good).

> The city commissions a fairly similar version of these surveys every year, with the intention of getting a handle on community sentiment about city services, about what Austinites think the city

is doing well or badly, and about any trends they might need to keep an eye on. Responses seldom change dramatically from year to year, although this survey was generated late in 2016, and the consultants note: "However, overall satisfaction with City services has

declined [since 2012]. This is a nationwide trend, as concerns about the economy, public safety, and issues related to the recent presidential election may have contributed to decreases in satisfaction with government during the past year." In other words, our short national nightmare-in-progress appears to have given some of us the glums.

YES, BUT ...

Nevertheless, the numbers continue to show that Austinites are mostly happy to be here - 80% of those surveyed say they are "satisfied" (49%) or "very satisfied" (31%) with life in Austin - and the overall satisfaction numbers with almost everything fairly high, and on average higher than for residents in peer cities (over 250,000 population). Certainly, most folks approve of the place they live - it's home, after all - so that while Austin is at 80%, the national average for large cities is 71%.

That doesn't mean we love everything about Austin and its city government - 68% say the city is doing a poor job of planning for growth, which might be another way of delivering the Austin cliche, "When I first got here things were great, but ..." Ratings on many city services - parks, public safety, libraries, airport, animal services - are high, with ABIA, for example, topping out at a 79% approval rating and "electric services" at 59% satisfaction. The break seems to come at health and human services, with only a 41% satisfaction rating (although 41% also offer a "neutral opinion"), and down at the very bottom - no surprise here - are "traffic flow on major city streets" (72% dissatisfied) and "traffic flow on major highways" (86% dissatisfied). Guess what: We've got "mobility" problems!

THE NUMBERS CONTINUE TO SHOW THAT **AUSTINITES ARE MOSTLY** HAPPY TO BE HERE.

DON'T MOVE HERE

In general, Austin scores pretty well in comparison to U.S. cities of comparable size, although we're badly below average on how residents judge the city's "planning for growth." Other large cities managed to achieve a 33% approval rating in that category; that sounds pretty bad, until you see that Austin currently sits at 13% satisfaction, fully 20% below the national average. (It's beyond the bounds of this survey to compare European cities on questions of planning and mobility; they've mostly been at it longer than we have, and are not quite so strongly wedded to, and strangled by, single-occupancy motor vehicles.)

I've been reading these surveys for several years now, and while it's not exactly news that Austinites love Austin, it has remained entertaining to compare how strongly we approve of our overall quality of life with how angrily we complain at City Hall during zoning hearings or Citizen Communications. Molly Ivins used to enjoy mocking how much Americans love survevs that tell us how ignorant we are compared to the citizens of other nations. At the current national political moment, that joke is neither so reassuring nor amusing as it once might have been.

Here in Austin, we continue to take pride in our music, in our weather, in our parks and libraries, in our great outdoors. and in most of what we get for our (somewhat grudging) tax payments for public services - the price we pay for a communally managed community. We remain uncertain whether we really want to share these public benefits with quite so many newcomers or soon-to-be newcomers. That, too, is not new.

Tool of Racism?

CodeNEXT FEARS AIRED: HOPES EXPRESSED

For a City Council and staff trying hard to put a happy face on the ongoing CodeNEXT process to rewrite Austin's land development code, it's been a tough 10 days - as several Eastside representatives came out with dramatic statements regarding the gentrification of the traditionally minority Eastside.

On Feb. 13, Austin's La Raza Roundtable sent a letter to City Council saying they fear "that the new code will fuel even more and faster displacement of longtime residents and businesses in East Austin, where our communities have already experienced tremendous gentrification in the past five to ten years."

Last week, in a different context, AISD Trustee **Ted Gordon** lamented the proposed move of the LASA magnet school, saying that "to tear down black Anderson and rebuild a

citadel to elite educational practices" in its place could be "the ultimate step in gentrification of the city."

Then on Wednesday, the Statesman front page Metro section led with the headline. "CodeNEXT derided as tool

of racism" by the mayor's own Task Force on Institutional Racism. Ouch.

In response to some of that criticism, perhaps, the

CodeNEXT consultants and city staff asked for a chance to brief Council this Wednesday, Feb. 22, and took the opportunity to lay out some of their secrets about mapping - to be revealed April 18 - and address a few of the most common questions and concerns that have arisen since the draft code came out. Various people noted how hard it is to discuss anything about the code, without seeing the mapping. As Jimmy Flannigan put it,

"Inherently, we're all predicting the worstcase scenario." But the consultants from

- Opticos Design gave some hints about how: • Compatibility has been integrated into the base zoning requirements, via increased setbacks, and reduced heights, for properties adjacent to, or across the alley from, low-density residential properties.
- Neighborhood Conservation Combining **Districts** and **Transit Oriented Districts** will be left in place - "exclusively in non-transect zones" - because they're deemed too fine-grained for the new code to replicate.
- Conditional Overlays will be replaced. where possible, with "new base zones that implement the same intent." Some COs will be left in place because they're so specific to the location.

• A new Conditional Use Permit process will require a "land use commission" approval, while a brand-new "Minor Use Permit" could be approved by staff without public hearings (that one seemed to make a couple of CMs nervous).

All in all it was a hugely helpful meeting - more information is always better than fearful speculation. Toward

the end Greg Guernsey, director of the **Planning and Zoning Department**, stated what is doubtless everyone's hope: "Zoning may not go away, but it could be less painful." And Mayor **Steve Adler** had the last word: "I'm not saying it's gonna be easy to get from here to there, but, I'm encouraged."

П City staff began public outreach sessions this week; at each meeting, they'll make a

brief presentation, set up displays of the key points in the code, and mingle to discuss and answer questions. Meetings are:

The fifth public meeting in that process is scheduled for 9am-noon on Saturday, Feb. 25, at Pillow Elementary School Cafeteria, 3025 Crosscreek Dr. See more info at www.austintexas.gov/northshoalcreek.

The public is invited to a discussion about the historic **Palm School** and the proposed expansion of the Austin Convention Center, on Saturday, Feb. 25, from 10am-noon at the Austin Convention Center, 500 E. Cesar Chavez (the room is still being determined). Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo and Travis County Commissioner Margaret Gómez will host the meeting; there may enough other CMs there for this to constitute a special called Council meeting. The ACC would dearly love to expand a full block to the west (see www.austinconventioncenter.com); Gómez is leading a work group to study Palm, a school campus since 1896. which the County may vacate in the near future.

Court Victory for Planned Parenthood, Medicaid

U.S. Federal District Judge Sam Sparks blocked Texas health officials from kicking Planned Parenthood out of Medicaid on Tuesday, writing that the action would stand against federal law and cause irreparable injury to the 12,000 low-income Texas women who visit the reproductive health provider. Sparks cited in a 42-page ruling that the Office of the Inspector General at the state's Health and Human Services Commission provided "no evidence" in its argument that PP should be cut from Medicaid for one Houston center's "history of altering" abortion procedures for research purposes. Since 2015, the OIG has based this



claim on discredited undercover anti-choice videos produced by the radical **Center for Medical Progress**. Sparks wrote that the videos and controversy surrounding them are more akin to a "best-selling novel" than a Medicaid case, "Yet, rather than a villain plotting to take over the world, the subject of this case is the State of Texas's efforts to expel a group of health care providers from a social health care program for families and individuals with limited resources." Texas Attorney General **Ken Paxton** vowed to appeal the ruling shortly after it was issued. For more on Sparks' decision, see "Judge Blocks Texas From Kicking Planned Parenthood ..." online.

AISD: Education for All Residents

Plyler v. Doe: That's the 1982 U.S. Supreme Court ruling stating that all students are entitled to a public education, regardless of immigration status. It's also the ruling **Austin ISD's board of trustees** cited this week in unanimously approving a resolution reaffirming that the district is open to and supportive of all residents. In a special meeting held Feb. 20, Superintendent Paul Cruz reminded trustees "we educate all students." and began to lay out how the district has been responding to the recent spike in ICE detentions, which includes meeting with the city and county, and providing additional support to teachers on how to talk to kids about the arrests. Cruz noted that students are coming to staff in fear about being deported - a nod to last week's clash over how proactive the district can be regarding this issue. On Feb. 13, a memo went out to administrators that detailed the legal limits of what teachers may or may not say while representing the district, but its language was condemned as too conservative by immigration groups, board members, and Education Austin, the district's employee union. In passing this new resolution, board president Kendall Pace said, "We recognize the fear in our communities. We also recognize that community engagement and trust building is tantamount to our collective success." - Richard Whittaker

Show Me Your Papers

A group of civil and immigrant rights groups have sent a thorough Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the feds to find out if **U.S. Immigrations** and Customs Enforcement or the White House were in coordinated talks with state officials before the widespread immigration crackdown in Texas. The Texas Civil Rights Project, Mexican American Legal **Defense and Education Fund, and Workers Defense** Project also want to know whether ICE's actions served as political payback. The raids came directly after Travis County Sheriff Sally Hernandez announced plans to not comply with noncriminal detainer requests and Dallas County Commissioners adopted a resolution that called to end nonessential ICE collaborations. FOIA search terms include Gov. Greg Abbott, Sheriff

Hernandez, and Travis County Judge Sarah Eckhardt. The groups are requesting an answer from the Department of Homeland Security by March 15.

"We are ready and prepared with the legal tools necessary to defend our immigrant communities," said Efrén C. Olivares, TCRP's racial and economic justice director. "This means we must reveal the facts that led to the wave of apprehensions in Texas. If the immigration raids were politically motivated, these actions raise serious legal and constitutional concerns that must be addressed."

Professors on Climate Change

Approximately 200 faculty members at a dozen colleges and universities in Texas have signed an open letter to President Donald Trump and his administration, urging continuing U.S. support for action against climate change under the 2016 Paris Climate Agreement.

"We the undersigned faculty," the letter begins, "are calling on you, in the most urgent terms possible, to maintain our country's commitment to meeting the greenhouse gas emission targets set forth in the Paris Climate Agreement. This agreement is the first in a series of steps required to avert substantial climate change. The Earth's climate is entering a state that has not been experienced in human history. Continuing to produce greenhouse gases at current rates will have catastrophic, unstoppable consequences for our environment, our economy, and our country. Bold and decisive action may still avoid the worst scenarios, allow for adaptation to the changes, mitigate the damage, and bring new economic opportunities to our country. To this end, we ask that you ensure America's place as the global leader on climate action."

The letter lays out the argument for the broad scientific consensus on global warming, and urges the administration to support the international agreement and "to lead the world in developing innovative ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions." It's signed by several dozen faculty members, across a range of disciplines, from UT-Austin, Texas A&M, Southwestern, Rice, Trinity, Univ. of Houston, Austin Community College, and several other institutions. COUNCIL CONSIDERS WHAT CONSTITUTES "TOO TALL"

There's no regular City Council meeting this week - the next is Thursday, March 2 and it's a good moment for a brief break, as last Thursday's session featured a couple of moments of tense melodrama and some prolonged disputation over matters that might not have seemed like flash points until council members begin to wade into them. In the morning, a proposal to increase nonprofit funding for immigrant legal defense sparked a tense exchange between Council Members Greg Casar and Ellen Troxclair - and a veiled, much later rebuke from Mayor Steve Adler against "getting too close" to personal attacks on the dais. ("Council: Robert Rules, OK?" Feb. 20)

In the afternoon, members got crossways over how best to revise their own committee structure - they have agreed there are too many committees (cutting the list from 10 to five) - but not how to organize the ones left, or who should be on them. (They're also constrained by their own 2015 actions, when they ceded the appointments to the mayor and limited committee size to four members.) A consultant's report on the matter is anticipated in a few weeks – maybe he or she can sort out the inside-baseball dif-

ferences, or at least sketch an agreeable path to move forward.

The conversation also got a bit heated a little later, over CM Ora Houston's proposal to explore adding more Eastside "Capitol View Corridors" - ban-

ning highrise construction that would obscure residential views of the Capitol – to the 30 that already exist. Houston called the matter a question of "equity" for Eastside residents – although some of the existing view corridors (protected as well under state law) do in fact protect views from the eastern sides of town. (One was waived years ago to enable an upper deck on Memorial Stadium, but then little in Texas is more sacred than football.)

The most telling testimony against additional corridors was by Central Health board member Juan Garza, who told Council that one of the corridors under consideration would directly obstruct the health district's plans to redevelop the obsolete Brackenridge Hospital site, intended to help underwrite the district's mission to provide indigent health care. Council agreed to treat that corridor separately – but otherwise, only CM Jimmy Flannigan seemed willing to review all the corridors (west and east) to consider whether they continue to make sense for a large city with serious sprawl and affordability problems.

Even the dead got involved in the dispute. The backup featured a letter of support from Benjamin Hanson, chairman of the Texas State Cemetery Committee, who pointed out that some of the Venerables interred there had their headstones oriented to the west "in order to face the Capitol building," and that former Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock had a high flagpole installed and a hill raised "to improve the view of the state Capitol." Apparently, Bullock and his departed cohorts can be expected to start spinning in dismay should they no

> longer be able to gaze eyelessly down upon their legislative successors.

Height was also at issue in the evening, when the Plaza Saltillo zoning case returned to the floor, for a second reading to

consider whether 1) a tract at the western edge of the site, bordering I-35, should be granted a variance to allow an eight-story (instead of a four-story) commercial tower; and 2) landowner Capital Metro and the developer (Endeavor Real Estate Group) had been misleading in 2014 when they promised a 25% quotient of affordable housing. The former is a request from Cap Metro to stimulate ridership and increase agency (and city) revenue; the latter a dispute over

whether it was made publicly clear that 25% affordability (promised by both competing development teams) was only possible with 10% city participation (the estimated difference would be 141 units vs. 200, among 800 units in all).


Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo and CM Leslie Pool were particularly hard on Endeavor spokesman **Jason Thumlert** over the affordability percentage - arguing that Endeavor should have made the distinction clearer three years ago - with Cap Metro supporting the developer on that issue and on the request for more tower height. The two questions - presumably both potential improvements to the project - became intertwined and opposed in the discussion, and the project passed on second reading without the additional height variance, and Tovo and Pool dissenting. A perplexed CM Flannigan wondered, "If you can't build an eight-story building on a highway on a train line, I'm not sure where you can build those things." They'll all get to revisit the matter next week, along with a hefty list of other cases, including the foreboding northwest project, the Austin Oaks PUD.

Meanwhile, Council has received three Wednesday briefings on the FY 2018 budget, consisting thus far of ("voluntary") budget overviews of the public safety departments, police, fire, and EMS - presenting their total budgets, their major cost drivers, and the budgetary challenges they see coming down the pike. The theory is that if Council can dig into the overall budget numbers earlier in the year and prior to the city manager's formal budget presentation, everybody will have a better sense of the larger budget context. "At the end of these meetings," Mayor Adler told his colleagues, "we'll really know how to do it. We will have learned a lot and know whether or not we need to do this again next year, or whether we don't." Judging from the first three sessions, more likely is that they'll be doing it all again this year - beginning in a couple of months. - Michael King

Voting Under Oath

There's a new kind of **protest vote** in Texas. The state's **voter ID** law allows people without one of the seven accepted forms of ID to sign an affidavit allowing them to cast a ballot. Over 16,400 Texans signed such an affidavit during last November's election. However, a recent study conducted by the Associated Press indicates that around 500 people statewide had a valid and acceptable ID yet signed the affidavit anyway. Most stated that they were signing as a protest against the law, something that could eventually see them face charges of **periury**. The Tarrant County elections division has already said that it would consider sending evidence of anyone "blatantly" violating the rules to the district attorney. Moving forward, lawmakers appear to be backing away from the old voter ID measure. After the U.S. Supreme Court refused to take the latest appeal against lower court findings that the rules are discriminatory, Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, filed Senate Bill 5, which would provide Texans with more ways to prove they are who they say they are at the ballot box, while simultaneously toughening up penalties for violations.



Richard Moya R.I.P.

Legendary Chicano activist and politician Richard Moya – the first Mexican-American elected to public office in Travis County, the Commissioners Court passed away Feb. 16, at the age of 84. Once described to the Statesman by former Austin mayor **Gus Garcia** as "knowledgeable, astute, street smart," Moya served as Precinct 4 Commissioner from 1970 to 1986; he was a graduate of Austin High School, served in the U.S. Army in Korea (just after the end of the Korean War), and before entering politics had a lengthy career as a professional printer. Prior to serving on the Commissioners Court, he was an investigator for the Travis County Legal Aid Society, and later a deputy chief of staff to former Gov. Ann Richards. Former state Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos, a lifelong friend and colleague, told the Chronicle: "I was fortunate to have been with him at the beginning of our political careers; I was fortunate to be with him on his last day. When [former City Council Member] John Treviño and Richard and I first met, we were working on War on Poverty programs. Richard was our brother, our uncle, our mentor. He did more to help this county and state for the better than a lot of other people would do in several lifetimes." A funeral mass will be held Friday, Feb. 24, at 2pm, St. Ignatius Martyr Catholic Church, with burial to follow at the Texas State Cemetery.

WHO'S TESTING APD'S BACKLOG OF EVIDENCE?

Austin Police have accumulated more than 4,000 untested DNA cases since the June shutdown of the department's forensics lab, and very little evidence has been tested in the interim. According to updates provided by APD Forensic Unit Commander Mike Eveleth to the Public Safety Commission and Sex Crimes Unit Lt. Gena Curtis to the city's Sexual Assault Response and Resource Team (SARRT), the department's evidence backlog continues to grow as lab capacity concerns across the state prevent APD cases from

getting tested. In an attempt to address the growing pile of untested evidence, City Council last week approved yet another contract with a new lab, Signature Science. Though the North Austin lab is currently working serology tests on 30 of APD's outstanding


cases, the updated \$2 million contract (which APD is funding with grant money and pre-existing funds) will make Signature a "start-to-finish lab for us," Eveleth told the commissioners at their Feb. 6 meeting. The lab will become fullservice for APD to cover DNA testing and CODIS (the FBI's DNA database) entry. "The goal is for them to be working 60 cases a month for us after [this initial] two-month period," said Eveleth.

The contract is the latest step in a longrunning saga that began when the Texas Forensic Science Commission recommended a shutdown of APD's lab last summer after an audit revealed a long list of professional oversights, including the use of outdated testing procedures. Former Chief Art Acevedo temporarily closed the lab in June, and sent six analysts to the Department of Public Safety for retraining. In November, Council approved APD's proposal for a six-year interlocal agreement

with Dallas County's Southwestern Institute of Forensic Sciences (SWIFS). APD representatives hailed SWIFS as the light at the end of the forensic tunnel, suggesting the Dallas lab would play a primary role in clearing the overstocked backlog, specifically sexual assault kits, which currently make up 80% of

APD's untested evidence.

APD and SWIFS have actually been contracted partners since 2008; the Dallas lab had assisted APD with toxicology testing for drunk driving cases. The updated agreement extended its services to forensic testing for up to six years, at a cost to APD of \$1.6 million for the first year and a maximum of \$3.6 million for the total contract. In late December, after Acevedo left APD, Interim Chief Brian Manley ceased



all efforts to reopen the lab. Soon after, four of the six analysts receiving DPS training were discharged without completing the retraining process due to incompetency. And just before the new year, Manley indicated that capacity issues would limit SWIFS to taking only 20 APD cases per month.

Now, less than two months later, APD reports that the same capacity issues are blocking SWIFS from analyzing any Austin evidence altogether. Eveleth made that known to the PSC earlier this month, and Assistant Chief Troy Gay confirmed via email: SWIFS "maxed out." The contract, however, remains "currently active." If the Dallas lab manages to "clear their own backlog, and can accept additional APD cases, we will be able to send them more," he told the Chronicle.

In the meantime, APD's backlogged evidence seems to be collecting dust. While all evidence from new cases still gets sent to DPS, the state office can only analyze 20 APD cases per month. Many of those are selected by the Travis County District Attorney's Office, depending on upcoming trials and statutes of limitations. Two private labs - Sorenson in Utah and Bode Cellmark in Virginia - are currently handling the "back backlog" of rape kit testing covered by the New York County D.A.'s Sexual Assault Kit Backlog Elimination Grant and Texas Senate Bill 1636 (sponsored by former state Sen. Wendy Davis in 2011), which requires

Stop. Record. Pause: APD Body Cameras Delayed Indefinitely



Body cameras were back in the news last week, though Austin Police officers are no closer to getting them. After learning last week that City Council planned to address (and likely approve) the purchase of 724 wearable devices from Taser International, small-market vendor Utility Associates Inc. obtained a restraining order in Karin Crump's 250th District Court to block the signing of that contract. Council shelved the Item indefinitely in response, leaving body cams in limbo for the foreseeable future.

Utility has been locked in a legal dispute with the city over the outcome of last year's bidding process, with that case now stalled in appeals ("Out of Focus," Nov. 25, 2016). Council was poised to approve a one-year contract to provide APD with the cameras, with up to four one-year extensions, at a cost of \$4 million. Last August, District Judge Orlinda Naranjo restrained the city from fulfilling a separate, much larger contract it had signed with Taser to provide about 1,700 cameras, after Utility protested the city's choice and petitioned the court to stop the contract from proceeding.

City spokesperson Alicia Dean told the Chronicle last week that the two contracts were not connected, and that both could still be fulfilled going forward. "One does not negate the other," she said. Were both contracts to come to fruition, the city could pay Taser \$16.2 million for cameras and support services. The police department needs and will use all the cameras should they get them, Dean said.

With the larger Taser contract on ice since last August, the city sought to use a purchasing cooperative administered by the

Texas Association of School Boards known as BuyBoard, which does not require city officials submit a request for proposal (RFP). Council's support documents indicated that that move was prompted by the department's continuing need for the cameras, and concern that \$750,000 in grant funding might be lost.

In court filings last Tuesday, Feb. 14, Utility and co-plaintiff Bruce Evans (an Austin resident who joined the case to strengthen jurisdiction) accused the city of "scandalous tactics" and asked the court to intervene to prevent the city from being able

to sign a second contract with Taser, given that the original dispute has yet to be settled. The following day, Judge Crump granted the temporary restraining order, writing that without one, the city might execute or begin performing a contract with Taser, which "would violate or circumvent" the court's earlier orders and "cause irreparable injury" to the plaintiffs. Documents filed with the court also include requests to enter into nonbinding mediation and reference proposals by Utility to resolve the matter out of court. none of which have apparently borne fruit. (Utility CEO Ted Davis declined comment, as did the company's attorney. In previous interviews with the Chronicle, Davis has been adamant that his company deserves to have been awarded the contract.) A hearing set for Thursday, Feb. 23, should determine whether the restraining order will be reclassified as a temporary injunction pending a full trial.

The city issued a statement in response, which read in part: "The City of Austin believes this cooperative purchase is a way to outfit a limited number of officers with cameras while still abiding by the August 2016 injunction, which remains in place, regarding the initial contract for this technology." The city assured that it plans to abide by the court's ruling. - Margaret Nicklas all kits taken before 2011 to be tested and all new ones be sent to a lab within 30 days after a sexual assault forensics exam is conducted. According to Gay, the FBI, SWIFS, and Signature Science labs are currently testing a small number (22-60 each) of APD's cases, specifically rape kits. Yet those numbers are much too small to drive a dent into APD's backlog of 3,294 sexual assault cases.

Stakeholders outside the police department suggest, however, that the problem is larger and more broad than APD has publicly acknowledged. While Eveleth reported one set of numbers to the Public Safety Commission, other agencies were given bleaker updates. SARRT was informed that more than 1,000 new cases have amassed since the lab's closure and "everything is on hold," including homicide and child abuse cases, according to Emily LeBlanc, the project's local co-chair.

"The SARRT is extremely concerned that sexual assault survivors are once again not being given the attention and priority they deserve," said LeBlanc. "Austin is facing an epidemic of sexual assault and delaying evidence testing any further not only jeopardizes justice for thousands of victims, it does so at the expense of public safety."

Because the majority of APD's backlog remains untested rape kits, the two issues are inseparable. City Council Member Greg Casar told the Chronicle he's "worried about the message we send to survivors in our community when they read that there

are hundreds of recent cases that haven't been tested." Gav says that 24-30 new sexual assault kits are submitted to DPS each month through APD, but in December SAFE confirmed one to two forensic exams are performed each day on their campus, where most local exams are conducted.

Gay and Eveleth both hope the Signature Science contract, as well as an impending agreement with DPS to cover serology testing and CODIS entry (and eventually DNA work), will lessen APD's incoming caseload. The DPS agreement would let APD use the \$1.4 million originally allocated to hire new staff for their DNA lab, to instead hire up to seven additional analysts to work under DPS. According to Gay, these hires would focus solely on APD cases. The analysts who continued DPS training will begin testing APD evidence at DPS no later than April 1. Additionally, within the next four to six months, APD hopes to begin submitting 20 cases per month to University of North Texas' Forensic Science Program.

Gay called the Signature Science agreement a "step in the right direction" to both address and reduce the current backlog, which he said remains a "top priority for our organization and the community we serve." Casar agreed: "I'm glad Council approved the contract so that we can move forward with testing sexual assault evidence, but the city still has a long way to go toward ensuring justice for survivors in our community." - Sarah Marloff

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Shatter the Glass ... Table

STANDING UP TO ANTI-CHOICE RHETORIC DURING A THREE-BILL FRENZY AT THE CAPITOL

Not much has changed in the Senate chamber where male lawmakers infamously tried in 2013 to silence their women counterparts for standing up against anti-choice bills. Take last Wednesday, for example, during an all-day Texas Senate Committee on Health & Human Services hearing on a trio of abortion restrictions, in which Maggie Hennessy, a master's student at UT and an intern with NARAL Pro-Choice Texas, delivered passionate testimony against the bills to a table of mostly white, male legislators. Over her allotted time, Hennessy was given a warning to stop talking. But she continued, in an effort to complete her final sentence.

"I urge you to all stop playing with reproductive health care like it's your own political puppet," she said, angering Sen. Charles Schwertner, R-Georgetown, chair of the HHS committee. Schwertner gaveled her into silence so hard he shattered the glass on his table, evoking stunned shock among those inside the chamber. If there was ever visible proof of how intensely Texas GOP lawmakers want to shut down pro-choice women and literally push them away from the decision-making table, Schwertner's gaveling was it.

The heated outburst came after Hennessy, like dozens of other pro-choice testifiers, explained to senators how Senate Bill 415. authored by Sen. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock, would ban the safest and most common second-trimester abortion procedure, known as dilation and evacuation (D&E), and could put women's lives in jeopardy. (Notably, Joe Pojman of the anti-choice group Texas Alliance for Life had urged senators to reject the "reckless" bill as it would not be able to survive any challenge in federal court.) Also up for debate that day were **SB 258**, a bill sponsored

by Sen. Don Huffines, R-Dallas, that would require fetal remains be buried or cremated, and Schwertner's SB 8. which would restrict fetal tissue donation and prohibit the already illegal dilation and extraction (D&X) procedure, ideologically referred to as "partial-birth abortion." Opponents argue that all three bills compromise safety, the doctorpatient relationship, and women's ability to access legal abortion.

Hennessy wasn't the only passionate testifier. Austin Community College Trustee Julie Ann Nitsch delivered a scathing rebuke of not just the legislation but the lawmakers. "You should be ashamed of yourself. I am ashamed to be a Texan because of you," she seethed. Lucy Stein of Progress Texas slammed the public process - senators only invited testimony from anti-choice figures, who were given four minutes each, while general testimony was limited to two minutes, and the public

received just 48 hours' notice of the hearing. "The resistance is emboldened, too, and we will not be silenced," said Stein.

Meanwhile, anti-choice activists filled the room with inflammatory and fictional terminology (we should note at some point that "dismemberment abortion" is not an actual medical term), lobbied lawmakers to outright ban abortion, and even compared the fight against abortion in Texas to the Holocaust.

Clad in a symbolic orange tie, Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin, grilled bill authors, asking each of the three to explain how their legislation "enhances the health and safety

of women." Stunningly, in a reversal of their veiled defense of previous antichoice bills, each lawmaker admitted that such health and safety wasn't the objective. "The health of the woman is not the target of SB 415," said Perry. And even more revealing, when asked if he believes women deserve the constitutionally protected right to bodily autonomy and dignity, Huffines chillingly declined to say yes. "I was surprised by his candor," Watson told the Chronicle after the hearing. "I don't think he'd ever been asked that question so directly. But it pretty openly sums up his misguided effort and reveals his lack of respect for women."

While all three bills were left pending in committee, don't expect them - or the toxic masculinity and machismo exhibited by antichoice lawmakers - to fade away this session. If Hennessy's testimony is any indication, one should not dismiss the voices of those who will not cower to

attempts to silence and intimidate women and pro-choice advocates, either.

"It was my first time testifying at the Capitol, so it really shocked me," Hennessy told me after the hearing. "But [Schwertner] doesn't scare me - in fact, his behavior just encourages me to testify more and fight even harder." - Mary Tuma

Planes, High-Speed Trains or Automobiles

Senate Bill 973, Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe

Japan has it. Sweden. France, Germany, Britain. Even Uzbekistan gets around with it. High-speed rail has proven to be fast, convenient, and efficient. But Texas has seemingly dug its heels in against it. This session, Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe, has filed SB 973, adding extra hoops to any rail company's efforts to start surveying for a high-speed rail line (any line capable of carrying trains at speeds faster than 110 mph).

Creighton's bill is all about derailing development of a planned HSR link between Houston and Dallas, which private rail firm **Texas Central Partners** has proposed as a 200 mph, 90-minute alternative to a short flight or the misery of driving I-45. And Creighton is not alone: Over a dozen bills have been filed to add extra impediments to such construction. Among the stack is SB 981 from Sen.

Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brennan, who has a long history of voting against alternatives to gas-guzzling road transportation – and, by sheer coincidence, happens to own Kolkhorst Petroleum, a family concern that used to own the Rattlers roadside convenience store chain. Of course, the road and airline industries have long held a vested interest in blocking development of a bullet

train-style system in Texas. Fighting from the other side may well be the influential Texas Association of Business, whose new CEO Jeff Moseley arrives from his old job as state vice president of government affairs for (guess who?) Texas Central Partners. Let the lobbyist death match begin! - Richard Whittaker

Let's (Not) Talk About Sex

When it comes to sex education in Texas, students are more likely to learn the details on the street than in the classroom. More than 83% of state school districts either don't teach sex education or teach abstinence-only lessons, according to a new study from the watchdogs at Texas Freedom Network's Education Fund.

The report, Conspiracy of Silence: Sexuality Education in Texas Public Schools shows that the number of districts that don't teach sex ed jumped from 2.3% in the 2007-08 school year to more than 25% in 2015-16. More than half of the districts that took the abstinence-only approach provided medically inaccurate instruction on condoms and other forms of birth control - which doesn't bode well for a state that ranks fifth nationally in teen birth rates. The study also found that most sex ed in Texas doesn't consider LGBTQ youth experience and perpetuates



fear and gender stereotypes in instruction. Austin ISD teaches the abstinence-plus "Big Decisions" curriculum and the abstinence-only Holt Lifetime Health textbook, according to the report. Anti-choice, Christian-based crisis pregnancy center Austin LifeCare offers an "Austin LifeGuard" curriculum.

"When it comes to sex education, Texas is failing our students and their families," said **Kathy Miller**, president of TFN. "We have to trust young people with the information they need to make wise decisions about their reproductive health and their future. Ignorance won't protect them."

The Lege hasn't helped: In 2009, it voted to nix high school health class (where sex ed is usually taught) as a graduation requirement. This session, as in the recent past, Dem lawmakers have attempted to undo some of the damage: State Rep. Mary González, D-Clint, has filed House Bill 1547, which would require sex ed instruction to include medically accurate information on abstinence and birth control. - Marv Tuma

Paul Ryan Should Sit Down and Be Very Quiet

For nearly half a century now, America's middle-class working families have been pummeled by corporate greedmeisters and their political henchmen. Indeed, in just the last decade, the typical median-income family has lost 60% of their wealth. Haven't they been punished enough?

No, says House Speaker Paul Ryan. Along with other top Republican leaders in Congress, Ryan intends to slash the Social Security money that middle-class and lowincome workers depend on, and he ultimately is out to kill it altogether. Dependence on such public "entitlements," he preaches, weakens our nation's morality.

Entitlements? Social Security isn't a welfare program - regular working people pay a 12% tax on every dime of their wages into the public pension fund year after year. They earn their retirement!

Morality? Social Security embodies America's core moral value of fairness and our

society's commitment to the common good. And it works - before it was enacted, half of all Americans spent their "golden years" in poverty. Social Security has saved the great majority of us from old-age penury. Where is the morality in taking this earned retirement and modicum of dignity from millions?

Besides, a sermon on the morality of entitlements should never come from a congress critter's mouth. Speaker Ryan himself wallows in a mud pit of congressional entitlements that working stiffs couldn't imagine getting: A \$223,500 annual paycheck, free limousine and chauffeur, a maximum-coverage health plan, a tax-paid PR agent, lavish expense account, free travel ... and, of course, a platinum-level congressional retirement program funded by the very taxpayers whose Social Security he's out to kill.

Yet Ryan wonders why Congress' public approval rating is plummeting toward single digits.

ublic pension systems - funds that pay out retirement income to city employees, based on years of service and contributions made during employment – often face similar hurdles as people planning private retirement: Saving for tomorrow competes with spending that same money today. A city strained for resources may look to skimp on contributing to its employees' retirement funds, or even borrow from those funds to cover other priorities, just as an individual might pull money from an IRA before retirement, with plans to return that money later on. Retirement boards and their staff, entrusted with managing the funds and certain benefits, may fail to properly recognize problems or make critical decisions. When either occurs, city employees, retirees, and city taxpayers suffer losses.

Recently, that unfortunate cause and effect has played out in spectacular fashion up in Dallas, where city officials and those responsible for the city's fire and police retirement fund have done everything but fistfight over escalating pension problems. The Dallas Morning News has called the fallout "misery" - a system "on the verge of collapse within the next decade thanks to poor investments and unsustainable benefits." In 2015, City Council got an earful from police and fire retirement fund Executive Director Kelly Gottschalk, whose analysis showed that while contributions to the fund had gone up, those contributions had not kept pace with benefit increases. More important, however, were the extreme costs associated with a "side benefit," the Deferred Retirement Option Plan (DROP), which allowed members who could otherwise retire to keep working and save retirement checks in a high-interest savings account.

DROP, Gottschalk reported, had cost the system nearly \$500 million, primarily due to excessive interest rates. Coupled with rotten investments that had ravaged the fund's portfolio, the program forced Gottschalk to lobby for a substantial reform of employee benefits. Otherwise, the nearly \$10 billion fund would be insolvent within 15 years. Members rejected the proposal, amidst lawsuits from several retirees and one from the mayor, Mike Rawlings, who'd hoped to stop DROP's pricey bleeding.

Today, city leaders in Dallas appear stymied by the deep divisions over how to preserve the fund in a way that's fair yet keeps public safety staffing stable, even as the city faces lawsuits over benefits which would be most costly to lose. Three former mayors have expressed concern about the pension crisis causing a "\$4 billion hit to the Dallas taxpayer." Together, they've formed a group called Taxpayers for a Fair Pension, which seeks a new system to give "equal governing authority" to taxpayers and system beneficiaries. In January, Dallas' City Council passed a resolution to encourage the system's board to take all lawful measures, including seeking judicial remedies, to "address this emergency situation," followed by calls in February to place the fund in receivership.

Dallas isn't the only Texas city facing serious pension issues. In Houston, the situation hasn't been as outright adversarial, but its far larger system reached a critical threshold in 2016 after years of chronic and publicly acknowledged underfunding. (Houston has nearly 44,000 workers and retirees in its three main retirement systems. Dallas can claim just under 10,000 in its police and fire system.) An analysis from Rice University's Kinder Institute indicated that pension debt for these three funds jumped from nonexistent in 2000 to nearly

Council. Critics are concerned, though, that it trades one form of debt for another (the city is still paying off old pension obligation bonds), and firefighters have held back from fully supporting the plan.

ALMOST IMPENDING DISASTER

Both Dallas and Houston illustrate how management of traditionally structured public pensions can prove as political as it is financial, and sometimes pit state lawmakers, city council members, and city managers against employee groups and taxpayers

Boomtown at Risk?

Pension systems in Dallas and Houston have been beat up by bad spending. Can Austin's avoid a similar fate?

\$4 billion in 2014. In 2015, a city audit threw the issue into focus just as Mayor Sylvester Turner was taking office.

Turner has been somewhat successful sidestepping any serious eruption by embracing the debt crisis and working with affected parties to forge a plan that shares the pain between city employees and citizens. Last October, he introduced a plan to reduce employee benefits, pay down debt in the short-term through a bond, and hold the city more accountable for future contributions, moves that will stabilize the retirement fund moving forward.

Such a plan requires legislative approval, but in October it received support from pension representatives and Houston City in a struggle over how city dollars should be spent. To many, pensions represent a contract that's becoming increasingly rare in the modern workplace: a reward for loyalty and low wages for essential civic service most people don't want to do themselves: police, fire, and emergency medicine; trash collectors, utility workers, and health inspectors. To others, they are an outdated and expensive notion local governments can no longer afford.

That many cities face challenges funding pensions is no surprise. Markets have been volatile in recent years. A common practice of setting future earning estimates too high has resulted in many retirement systems overstating their ability to cover costs going forward. And new accounting rules have made the problems of underfunded cities more obvious.

Austin is not immune to these issues. A 2013 Pew report listed Austin among 37 cities for which pensions were underfunded at the close of the recent recession. Last December, financial analysts at Moody's named Austin as a city that suffers from high levels of unfunded pension liabilities (the amount of current and future benefits the city owes but could not cover if forced to pay today), sometimes called pension debt. Two of the city's three funds - those for police and city employees, including Austin-Travis County medics (there's a third for firefighters) - report funding ratios of less than 70%. If the city were tasked today with paying out its full lot of retirement benefits, these funds would fail to put up even seventenths the needed amount.

Last November, consultants at the Houston-based Arnold Foundation issued a lengthy report on the financial outlook of Austin's pension programs: "A Boomtown at Risk: Austin's Mounting Public Pension Debt." It conveyed a sense of urgency almost impending disaster - citing pension debt across all three systems of \$1.8 billion. The firefighter and police funds each represent about \$1 billion in total pension obligations. The city employees' system is much larger at about \$3.4 billion. The report's authors were especially troubled by Austin's rapid growth and the resulting expansion of its workforce. Between 2008 and 2015, the city's three retirement systems grew by about 573 active participants. Between 2003 and 2011, the report stated, the city shorted its employees' fund by roughly \$170 million, based on a rule of thumb that cities should contribute enough to ensure they can reach full funding within 30 years. Austin's funds can currently reach full funding in 33 years or less. The report warned: "If Austin experiences an economic downturn in the future, it might not be able to keep up with its payments."

The foundation considered Austin's system lacking in how it estimated future earnings, pointing to assumed rates on returns of investment that it believed would prove unachievable. The three funds' rates ranged between 7.5% and 7.8% in 2016. "If the assumed rates of return were lowered to 6.5 percent for each plan," Paulina S. Diaz Aguirre and Josh McGee wrote, "the system's total debt would jump to \$2.6 billion," which illustrates how over-optimistic projections can mask true funding requirements. The less a fund can expect to earn on investments, the more it needs to come up with in the form of contributions from employers and employees.

The report found specific fault with the city employees' retirement system's investment strategy, noting that 17% of its assets were invested in "hard-to-value, illiquid assets like real estate and alternatives," which could lead to serious trouble if returns aren't adequate. Eric Ralph, a financial adviser for City of Austin Employees' Retirement System (COAERS), corrected

the report's characterization of the fund's investments in an interview with the Chronicle. For instance, its real estate investments, representing about 9% of the portfolio, are conservatively managed through Principal Global Investors and easily liquidated, he said. The foundation urged the city to consider replacing defined benefit plans - which provide benefits for life - with less costly options, and to lobby for local control of how plans get structured, something the foundation also recommended for Dallas and Houston. Doing so, the foundation's October report on Dallas read, "would give the city the authority to change the plan's governance structure and design, ensuring its long-term sustainability." But both reports are vague regarding how those changes would improve fund management.

The foundation also acknowledged that Austin's pension problems are not dire, and critics have since questioned the report's conclusions, saying it appeared to assume that defined benefit plans no longer hold a place in modern retirement systems. Ed Van Eenoo, the city's deputy CFO and a member of its employees' retirement board, told the Chronicle he thought the report "was written with a bent toward cities moving away from defined benefits plans and with a preference for defined contribution plans." And Pattie Featherston, executive director of the Austin Police Retirement System, issued a statement asserting that the foundation's "push" to eliminate public defined benefit plans in favor of other options was mired in "flawed myths about cost savings."

Whereas the report stated that the city's rapid growth could spell trouble for city pensions, Chris Hanson, executive director of COAERS, argued the effects of growth are actually opposite: In 2012, new hires began to incur a benefit reduction; when these workers retire, their benefits will be some 17% lower than that applied to work-

ers hired prior to that year. The city also made adjustments to rules regarding cost of living adjustments (COLA); they now require the approval of Council and the city manager. (No COLAs have been granted to retirees since 2002.)

"Hiring the lower-cost new employees is actually better for us," said Hanson. "The sooner we get more group B people in than group A, the faster we'll get our amortization period down and our funded ratio up."


Shortly after the report's release, Hanson issued a statement in response: "COAERS and the City of

Austin have a long, amicable history of working cooperatively to address pension issues. The existing governance structure has not been an obstacle to pension reform, nor has it limited the city's ability to make additional contributions to the fund."


A SERIES OF TOUGH DECISIONS

State statute requires that retirement system boards for Austin's three funds include members of City Council, city management,

active and retired employees, and at least one citizen trustee. (Dallas' board is comprised of only council members, employees, and retirees. In Houston, boards don't include common citizens.) The distinction is important. Citizens who are not system beneficiaries provide an independent taxpayer viewpoint, while representatives of city management are often more experienced in financial planning and management - and less often subject to political pressure. Statutes governing Austin's funds also allow employer contributions to be increased through a council vote and employee contributions through member votes. In contrast,

of benefits that could be problematic, making changes quickly and decisively. The police fund's board began making significant changes in 2014. "I give them a lot of credit for doing that," he said. He called the changes "tough decisions."

Among those changes were significant alterations to the police system's DROP program. The board voted to stop paying interest on DROP accounts, and to begin charging fees on new accounts. At the same time, it extended from five to seven years the maximum length of time an individual can participate. Changes to the DROP and other benefit programs were largely intend-

Board leadership and officers (both active and retired) have supported the necessary changes. Andrew Romero, an APRS board member since 2014 and a vice president of the Austin Police Association, said officers have shown a willingness to accept reduced benefits in order to better preserve the system. "To me, what that says is the members support making good decisions that lead to the long-term health of the fund," he said.

For the city's much larger city employees' retirement system - which manages pension for about 15,300 employees - changes have been underway since at least 2011. Van Eenoo told the Chronicle that Austin "is not

> exactly where we want to be" but noted that the city has been proactive in addressing policies that need adjustment.

> "I think we are taking all the right steps to make sure these plans are sustainable in the future," he said, adding that actuarial indications show the city will arrive at the healthier financial status it seeks in the next 10-15 vears. Van Eenoo said that losses associated with the 2008 recession, not poor fund management, drove the need to revise projections. "We have created a second-tier lower-

cost plan for new employees ... and increased contributions to the fund so it remains stable and sustainable into the future," Van Eenoo said. "The city had the wherewithal and the foresight to do what needed to be done to keep the fund sustainable. I'm not sure that every city would do that."

Dallas' and Houston's funds require meetand-confer agreements, city votes, or legislative action to make changes.

Robert Klausner, a legal adviser whose firm has worked with hundreds of pension systems across the country, said Austin provided "an example of what boards of trustees should do." In his eight years working with Austin Police's system, Klausner has been impressed with how members have acted on their own to identify costly features ed to make the programs "cost-neutral," according to Tim Atkinson, a recently retired APD detective and board chair of the Austin Police Retirement System. Rather than costing the system money, the updates ensure that the system at least breaks even, he said. Atkinson reported in a 2016 member newsletter that the board saved the system \$18 million and cut its amortization period by almost seven years as a result of the various changes.

NOT FIXING WHAT'S NOT BROKEN

At the state level, efforts to give cities more control over their own public pensions

have been percolating around the Capitol since 2015's legislative session and may be gaining momentum in the current session. Two bills in particular aim to give more power to local governments and taxpayers. Senate Bill 152, sponsored by Sen. Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston, would let cities eliminate defined benefit plans for statecreated retirement systems in favor of defined contribution plans, a switch that is strongly opposed by public safety and municipal workers but which Bettencourt sees as necessary. He told the Chronicle that defined benefit plans "are simply not viable long-term in the 21st century the way they are structured," both because they are costing taxpayers too dearly, and because in most cases they represent benefits for government workers that are "astoundingly high" compared to what is available to private sector workers. One catch with converting to a defined contribution plan is that those covered by the old plan must continue to receive their lifetime benefits, even as new contributions are not funding the plan, creating significant financial stresses in the short-term. SB 151, also by Bettencourt, would require voter approval to issue any obligation bond to fund pension obligations.

There's also House Bill 43, filed by state Rep. Dan Flynn, R-Canton, which only applies to Houston, and essentially serves as a placeholder for Mayor Turner's proposed reform plan for which he needs legislative approval. Neither it nor the substitute is expected to change the city's defined benefits structure.

As controversial for some as the bills, however, is the composition of the state's Pension Review Board, and its current chair, Josh McGee, the Arnold Foundation VP who coauthored "A Boomtown at Risk" and who was appointed to the PRB in 2015 by Gov. Greg Abbott. The Austin American-Statesman reported in December 2015, shortly after McGee took the chairmanship, that a dozen labor groups called on Gov. Abbott to rescind

the appointment. In that story, Tim Lee, who presides over the Texas Retired Teachers Association, called it "shocking" - "the worst possible choice to be chairman." Charley Wilkison, executive director of the Combined Law Enforcement Associations of Texas, a statewide police union, said McGee's presence amounted to "a serious threat to the livelihood of officers who sacrifice so much for the people of Texas."

Whether this move foreshadows a statesanctioned effort to push locals away from defined benefit plans remains to be seen. But the issue is likely to come up in McGee's confirmation hearing (he wasn't confirmed in 2015 because the Lege wasn't in session). Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin, vice chair of the Senate Committee on Nominations, told the Chronicle that he will "seriously consider any allegation of a conflict of interest" as he weighs whether to recommend McGee's nomination to the full Senate.

The decision to stick with defined benefit plans locally is rooted in the idea that Austin's pension system is not in need of major repair. As the troubles unfolding in Dallas and Houston continue to fuel proposals for reform, key stakeholders in Austin have yet to be convinced. "I see no need to fix what isn't broken here," said Watson. He lauded Austin for taking "significant steps" to improve the condition of its pension funds and for the degree of cooperation between "City Hall and employee groups."

Hanson agrees. He used to preside over the PRB, and emphasized the importance of looking at the complete picture in Austin, rather than fixating on specific measures. What's important, he said, is a fund's trajectory. The long-term trend in Austin points toward improvement, one driven largely by the reduced benefits new hires will receive. After the Arnold Foundation report came out, he got calls from retirees "worrying they weren't going to get their checks." He's been telling those retirees since then that their benefits are secure.





More Things to Worry About: Higher Math: The first robots to have survived journeys close to the "core" of the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear plant in Japan (which melted down in a 2011 earthquake) returned a reading of 530 "sieverts" per hour. (Some scientists label just four sieverts an hour fatal to half the people exposed to it.) Since the robots stopped short of the actual nuclear fuel, and since they only visited one of the three cores, the true danger of Fukushima remains unknown. (On a more optimistic note, scientists in February said they have developed a computer chip that would survive on the surface of Venus for 21 days, eclipsing the old record of two hours - long enough to send back meaningful data, including the temperature. The current estimated temperature is 878 degrees Fahrenheit.)

Wrong Place, Wrong Time

An Abbotsford, British Columbia, burglar was successful in his Feb. 7 break-in at a home, but his getaway was thwarted by snowfall that blocked him in on a roadway. He eventually decided to ask a passerby for help - and inadvertently picked out a man (of the city's 140,000 residents) whose house he had just broken into (and who recognized him from reviewing his home's security camera footage). The victim called police, who arrested the man (and reported that it was the second residential break-in that night in which the snowfall had foiled a burglar's getaway.)

The Man With the Golden Mop

San Francisco's best-paid janitor earned more than a quarter-million dollars cleaning stations for Bay Area Rapid Transit in 2015, according to a recent investigation by Oakland's KTVU. Liang Zhao Zhang cleared almost \$58,000 in base pay and \$162,000 in overtime, and other benefits ran his total income to \$271,243. He worked at San Francisco's Powell Street station, a hangout for the homeless, who notoriously sullied the station 24/7 (urine, feces, and needles, especially), necessitating overtime hours that apparently only Zhang was interested in working. In one stretch during July 2015, he pulled 17-hour days for two and a half straight weeks.

Government Action

Legislators in Iowa and Florida recently advanced bills giving women who receive legal abortions up to 10 years (or longer, in lowa)

to sue the doctor if the abortion winds up causing them "emotional distress." (Doctors in all states are already liable, of course, for actual "negligence" in their practice.) In the Iowa version (which The Des Moines Register reported would likely face amendments), even a signed consent form by the patient would not immunize the doctor (but might mitigate the amount of damages awarded).

Great Art!

German art collector Rik Reinking paid the equivalent of about \$138,000 in 2008 for a resplendent, complex drawing by Belgian artist Wim Delvoye, but it was one created in ink on the skin of (the still-alive) tattoo parlor manager Tim Steiner – to be delivered only upon Steiner's death, when his skin will be displayed in Reinking's collection. (The deal also requires that, in the meantime, Steiner personally showcase his back at galleries three times a year, and BBC News recently caught his latest appearance.)

Priests Gone Bad

Prominent Tallahassee, Fla., pastor O. Jermaine Simmons, a community leader who ministers to the homeless and downtrodden, was rescued by police on Jan. 17, naked and hiding behind a fence after making a run for it when the husband of his mistress found the two in bed. The husband, screaming, "I'm gonna kill him," ran for his handgun, and the mistress summoned police, but by Jan. 30, all involved had declined to press charges. Simmons, married with a son, is

highly regarded for good deeds such as running a "cold night" shelter.

The decidedly uncelibate Catholic priest Don Andrea Contin, 48, of Padua, Italy, was accused by three women in December of having as many as 30 different lovers over the years, organizing "orgies" on church property, visiting a "swingers" resort in France several times, making pornographic home videos of his trysts, "encouraging" one woman to have sex with a horse, and "always" carrying a briefcase full of vibrators, sex toys, and bondage equipment. Contin has not yet been charged with a crime, but, said a Catholic official, is "finished" as a priest. (Bonus: The boxes for his home videos were labeled with the names of popes.)

Wait, What?

In January, a New York City judge dismissed the original indictment of John Kennedy O'Hara, 55, who had been convicted in 1996 of the crime of "felony voting" the only person convicted under that state law since Susan B. Anthony, who cast a ballot in 1872 even though females were barred from the polls. O'Hara was indicted for voting in 1992 and 1993 after registering in Brooklyn elections from a "bogus" address a basement apartment that was considered uninhabitable. (A judge in 2017 determined that the apartment "could" have been habitable.) O'Hara paid \$15,000 in fines and did 1,500 hours of community service.

Everyday Hazards

In Portland, Ore., in January, Ashley Glawe, 17, a committed "goth" character with tattoos, piercings, and earlobe holes ("gauges") was, she said, "hanging out" with Bart, her pet python, when he climbed into one of the lobes. She couldn't get him out, nor could firefighters, but with lubrication, hospital emergency workers did (thus avoiding an inevitable split lobe if Bart had kept squeezing his way through).

Iraqi forces taking over an ISIS base in Mosul in January reported finding papers from at least 14 Islamic State "fighters" who had tried to claim "health" problems, asking commanders to please excuse them from real combat (and martyrdom). One (a Belgian man) actually brought a note from a doctor back home attesting to his "back pain." Five of the 14 were initiated by volunteers from France, a country that endures a perhaps-deserved national reputation for battle-avoidance.

Least Competent Criminals


Recurring Themes: Once again, in January, curiosity got the better of a perp. Adriana Salas, 26, allegedly stole a truck in Jonesboro, Ark., and drove it to Ft. Smith, 260 miles away, but then could not resist stopping by the local sheriff's office to ask whether the truck had been reported stolen. (It had; deputies, taking a look outside, read Salas her Miranda rights.)

s Mayor Steve Adler took the podium on the Mayor's Balcony at City Hall in February 2016, the shining sun and blue sky seemed to signal this was a new day. And so it was for the city's music and creative sectors. He had brought together members of the Music Commission and Arts Commission – itself a rare thing – to stand with him as he unveiled his Austin Music & Creative Ecosystem Omnibus Resolution, a package of policy initiatives aimed at addressing critical problems in those industries (affordability; permitting and licensing regulations; economic incentives; et al.) and stimulating our creative economy.

Now, for years, the city had supported the music and creative sectors through offices and programs, and many city staffers, council members, and mayors had advocated for them. But never before had the city's leading elected official thrown so much of his political weight behind those sectors, going so far as to identify specific areas where the city needed to be proactive in improving conditions and directing the city manager to develop a plan of action within 90 days. All the shiny scene needed was those commissioners breaking into a chorus of "The Future's So Bright, I Gotta Wear Shades."

This week marks the first anniversary of the Omnibus Resolution's rollout. So what do our music and creative scenes have to show for the last 12 months? Not as much as you'd hoped, though maybe more than you'd think. If you followed the news over the past year, then you know the resolution didn't keep venues hammered by insane rent hikes from shuttering (R.I.P. Salvage Vanguard Theater, Brass House, et al.) or slow the exodus of artists and musicians over the city's lack of affordability. Nor did it resolve longstanding issues like how long and loud music can be played Downtown, meaning 2016 still saw headline-grabbers like the Westin's million-dollar lawsuit against the Nook over music volume.

So if we didn't get help in those areas, what did we get? A lot of talk - which, this being Austin, was expected. As a city, we're nothing if not prone to palavering, and in matters of municipal policy, we take full advantage of opportunities to weigh in. In April, the Arts Commission held a hearing on the Omnibus Resolution, and the Music Commission hosted several town hall meetings, each in a different district with that district's Council rep and Music Commission appointee attending, and each focused on specific forms of music (blues/soul/world, country & western/swing, Latin, rock, etc.). And at a historic joint meeting of the Arts and Music commissions, artists and musicians had more chances to comment.

But all that talk was useful talk. It reinforced how hard it is out there for a creative (stories of landlords raising rents 300-500% were common, as were tales of rough run-

ins with the city's code compliance force). Listening to two communities that usually consider themselves separate species sing identical songs of woe meant both were suffering from the same ills and might be aided by the same solutions. (And to be fair, not all speakers were reporting problems; some were proposing remedies, based on successful models in other cities and local efforts already underway.) This also helped the commissions work out which of the resolution's policy areas to focus on first.

tasked with prioritizing these for Council, each selected four as top priorities. It's telling that two areas showed up on both lists: land use regulations (opening restricted zoning areas in planned unit development and vertical mixed-use projects to creative spaces, facilitating development of affordable live/work spaces for artists) and permitting and licensing (streamlining the process of getting permits for creative spaces, bringing them into code compliance). The two bodies saw the crises in the same way.

A Year Later

Twelve months after Mayor Adler rolled out his Omnibus Resolution for live music and the arts, what's happened?

So what do Austin's music and creative sectors have to show for the last year? Not as much as you'd hoped, though maybe more than you'd think.

See, the mayor's original proposal, which treated the music and creative sectors separately, contained 30 goals and 67 objectives. In June, city staff organized those into a set of "Stabilization Recommendations" grouping them into 10 areas – Affordable Space; Agent of Change Principle; Entertainment License; Incentives, Tools, and Loans; Cultural Tourism; Land Use Regulations; Music Genre Development; Permitting and Licensing; Professional Development; and Revenue Development – but the description of them stretched them out to 68 pages. As the Arts and Music commissions were

Where the commissions diverged reflects the nature of their respective sectors and where they sit in the for-profit and nonprofit worlds. The largely nonprofit arts scene was more concerned with emergency assistance for companies and artists whose venues had closed or were threatened with closing over skyrocketing rents. Salvage Vanguard had to vacate its home of 10 years in June, which displaced not just SVT but also other groups that used it as a home base: Kathy Dunn Hamrick Dance Company, Trouble Puppet Theater Company, Glass Half Full Theatre, Church of the Friendly Ghost, et al. Moreover,

the clock was running down on the Off Center, the Eastside space managed for 17 years by the Rude Mechs, who made it available to numerous other groups. In June, the nationally renowned theatre collective will be homeless and another of the most used arts venues in town will be gone. Losing two major performing arts spaces in a year, with others such as Pump Project Art Complex facing a similar fate, moved venue assistance to the No. 1 spot. As the private sector has little incentive to invest in nonprofit arts spaces, a city-managed funding pool or low-interest loan program that could help SVT, the Rudes, and others save their homes or transition to new ones would go a long way toward keeping these invaluable cultural resources alive and active.

For the profit-based music scene, with venues in areas of immense appeal to developers, more crucial was a tool that could protect them when new housing or hotels sprang up near them. That's why the Music Commission made a priority of the Agent of Change Principle. It put the financial onus for sound mitigation measures on a new development built near established music venues. Change the neighborhood, you pay for the change. As Kevin Curtin noted in a "Playback" column, "The ongoing Westin vs. Nook conflict remains the poster child for Agent of Change." Had it been in place, the Westin wouldn't have been able to sue; the Nook was there first, so the hotel would've been on the hook for sound buffering costs.

Both Agent of Change and emergency venue assistance gained traction from the city last fall and have been inching toward implementation in the new year. The Arts Commission recommended that emergency venue assistance be funded to the tune of \$350,000; that was lowered to \$200,000, but it made it into the fiscal year 2017 budget, as did two other Omnibus Resolution items: \$200,000 to form an Entertainment Services Group that'll provide permitting and code assistance in the music and creative sectors as well as support the music sector's Austin Nightlife Initiative; and \$75,000 to launch a Revenue Development Platform for fostering various initiatives from cultural tourism to professional development. On Jan. 26, Council voted to activate these items, and city staff is now working out how to structure the venue assistance program. It will report back to Council by the end of March. Agent of Change is also due for a March presentation to Council based on input gathered in January hearings about it and the Entertainment License, another music sector priority aimed at condensing the intense permitting process for music venues - which involves upward of 16 permits from seven departments - to one point of contact.

The Music and Arts commissions' other priorities, land use regulation and permit-



ting and licensing, were put more or less on hold while CodeNEXT, the epic review and rejiggering of the land development code, was underway, though commissioners were kept updated on CodeNEXT activity by an advisory group member. With the first draft of the new code released, activity on those fronts should amp up. The Arts Commission will be briefed about it at its Feb. 27 meeting, and at the joint meeting of the Arts and Music commissions in March, CodeNEXT is expected to be on the agenda.

But the commissions' priorities aren't the only parts of the Omnibus Resolution where progress has been made. Preservation of creative spaces got a big push in September when the mayor announced a mini-bond program through which it would crowdsource \$10 million for the purpose of saving music venues. (More news on this initiative with public finance company Neighborly will be coming this spring, according to the mayor in his State of the City address.) Under the radar have also been working groups with members from the Arts and Music commissions tackling affordability issues and a marketing campaign for creatives; a Music Tourism Strike Team (with reps from the Music & Entertainment Division, Cultural Arts Division, and Austin Convention & Visitors Bureau) that's drafted a cultural tourism plan; CAD staff winding up the Cultural Asset Mapping Project, with its final report due for release in late March; and Music & Entertainment Division staff completing its long-range Industry Development Strategy by the end of February and a Live Music Venue Best Practice Guide sometime this spring. And there are efforts outside the city sphere, among them the Austin Creative Alliance's Creative Infrastructure Initiative, funded with a \$100,000 donation from Roy Mullin, that will support research, grants, and staff to develop creative infrastructure projects and support for them in the community, and Mosaic Sound Collective, which embodies the Omnibus Resolution's idea of a creative hub. ("Actualization Is Hard," p.54.)

That's all to say that one year after the sunny launch of the Omnibus Resolution, our music and creative sectors still have lots of dark clouds overhead. But few crises in this city are solved quickly. We're like an ocean liner with no engine, propelled by passengers and crewmen paddling like mad. Over the past year, more people in the creative and music sectors have been paddling, and that's due to Mayor Adler, who hasn't stopped urging them on. As recently as Jan. 30, speaking to the state of the city, he said, "The home of Austin City Limits, of SXSW, of Ballet Austin, and of Laguna Gloria must continue to be a city where culture is created and not simply consumed. ... Since this is Austin, the change agenda's focus on affordability must also deal with challenges in our local music industry and with our creative arts."

So the ship is moving. But if you think it isn't moving fast enough, grab an oar.



An Unforgettable Knight

Glass Half Full Theatre's Don Quixote de La Redo tells of walls and the stories that inspire us to tear them down

Once upon a time, a loud orange man with hands of indeterminate size ordered a tremendous wall to be constructed with the purpose of making his country great again. But there was a problem. There wasn't enough money to finish the job. So the great wall was completed with things people didn't want anymore. It is because of this that one particular section of the wall - located near Nuevo Laredo - is composed entirely of books. Now, 85 years after the 45th president is long gone, two

border wall technicians working to preserve his dystopian legacy stumble across Don Quixote in the pile of pages and mortar. As the workers become better acquainted with Quixote and his ever-

faithful companion, Sancho, a seed of rebellion is planted, and one thing becomes clear: While the urge to fight something that cannot die drives some to become demagogues, it inspires others to become heroes.

Miguel de Cervantes himself narrates Glass Half Full Theatre's incredibly imaginative and well-executed production of Don Ouixote de La Redo, a puppet-laced meditation on the walls we build and the stories that inspire us to tear them down.

> The show is also a very timely (and extremely effective) political commentary. Devised by the cast and stage management during a collaborative and improvisational rehearsal process, Don Quixote de La Redo began as

a retelling of the Quixote legend set along the Mexico-Texas border, but took a different and dark-American Cultural Center, 600 River er turn after the 2016 presidential election, after our current president announced plans to

build a giant wall along our country's southern border. As serious as the subject matter could be, the entire play crackles with humor - humor of all kinds, everything from literary references to dry wit to a good old-fashioned



diarrhea joke. Another impressive layer in this colossal script is that it's heavily bilingual, yet written clearly enough for anyone to understand, even if sus españoles son malos.

One thing's for certain about Glass Half Full Artistic Director Caroline Reck: Between her writing, designing, acting, and direction, she is one incredibly talented artist. And in Don Quixote de La Redo, she has assembled an all-star creative team that has built an immersive world steeped in equal parts whimsy and postapocalyptic angst. In the span of 80 minutes, Reck and her castmates Rudy Ramirez, Gricelda Silva, Indigo Rael, and Marina DeYoe-Pedraza take the audience on a Quixotian adventure in every sense of the word. The design team's no slouch, either. Everything from the costumes (designed by Jennifer Davis) to the set (Reck) hides sur-

prises of all sizes. K. Eliot Haynes and Taylor Juarez provide the soundtrack for the evening - an emotionally evocative mix of Spanish guitar and ambient emo-tinged alt-rock.

And, of course, there are the puppets. Quixote, Sancho, and Cervantes are small, multi-jointed dolls that are moved by several puppeteers (with precision timing) at once, resulting in hyperrealistic movement. Each character is beautifully voiced by the cast, and while there are other puppets on this adventure and they are absolutely worth citing, part of what makes this play so lovely is its commitment to present the audience with unexpected happenings (even after the show is over). This is a story that is not afraid to be whimsical in the face of ideas that are terrifying, and there's a lot of power in that.

And puppets.



Sometimes universities feel like the most insular of places, ivory towers where eccentricities and pontifical discourse are sheltered from the urgency of everyday life. But other times, as with Dance Repertory Theatre's program of dance works informed by African-American experiences and culture, the university feels like a watchtower, a vital refuge for truly considering, from myriad angles, some of the most serious issues of our time.

For Momentum, the faculty directors of the University of Texas Department of Theatre & Dance troupe - Charles O. Anderson, Jeremy Arnold, and Lyn C. Wiltshire - curated a total of 11 works: one by each director, three by faculty at other universities, three by professional choreographers outside of academia, and two by UT students. (The 11 works are shuffled into three different programs of 9-10 works each, performed in 10 performances over two weeks.) The works on the Feb. 17 program, while diverse in aesthetic and focus, mostly cohered in a highly physical, emotionally urgent offering.

A white floor and slipcovers on the seats dramatized Zora Neale Hurston's words, "I feel most colored when I am thrown against a sharp white background," quoted both in the program note for student Oluwaseun Samuel Olayiwola's "black is the new black" and in projections that flooded the floor and walls during Anderson's "(Re)current Unrest, pt. 2: In D'Nile." Against this flat and inanimate whiteness, the artists boundlessly explored blackness, African-American experience and culture, and African diaspora in dance.

The program opener, "Lec/Dem or How

Do You Spell Femaphobic" by University of Colorado - Boulder professor Gesel Mason, began as an entertaining lecturedemonstration and morphed into a 16-dancer embodiment of cultural labels on the female body, from the ridiculous to the silencing. In Anderson's "(re)current," the 21-member cast wore black masks with white crosses over their mouths. While one group stomped in syncopated rhythms, another, behind a scrim. raised their arms in surrender, laughing chillingly. Olaviwola's "black" focused on cultural feelings about the color, indirectly illuminating race issues with charming and inventive text and movement. Arnold, also a dancer with Tapestry Dance Company, continued his rhythm tap exploration of Bach with "Bach in Time," for eight women, and "Second to Khan," by Philadelphia choreographer Rennie Harris. dramatized the escalating terror of a police shooting and left a black man, eyes open, motionless on the floor.

Despite the overall high quality of the 10 works, the two-and-a-half-hour program may have proved too much for many of us. Not so, however, for the dancers. Unflagging, they challenged our fatigue with a refusal to let theirs show. In the program, the directors note that last April, DRT performed its spring concert under "horrific circumstances" -Bodies and Souls opened just days after the murder of first-year dance student Haruka Weiser, Perhaps, Momentum suggests, it is in continued remembrance of personal tragedies that we may find the strength to reach out in a broader scope, to continue where others falter. - Jonelle Seitz **INSTITUTION THEATER** 3708 Woodbury. 512/895-9580. www.theinstitutiontheater.com




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


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"TEXTSCAPE: SUSAN SCAFATI AND SEAN RIPPLE"

Co-Lab Projects DEMO Gallery, 721 Congress www.co-labprojects.org Through March 4

Susan Scafati and Sean Ripple's "textscape" treats the ubiquitous text interface as a visual environment. The intangible is made tangible, something we can touch, not only with our fingers, but with our bodies. Scafati's Scroll is a massive piece placed near the ceiling and spanning two walls. It buckles in places, protruding in colorful humps, at times mimicking the perforations in a strip of film, at others a jumbled skyline. In fact, the piece is overflowing with subtle echoes of the rectangular speech bubbles I recognize from my iPhone screen. Monolith is perhaps the most dramatic. It is a massive wooden speech bubble coupled with audio of a droning male voice and some jarring music. The wood itself is left untreated, industrial, a different kind of technology.

The speech bubble persists. Scafati's Relief is a series of flat, white speech bubbles pressed close to the wall, clean and graphic as the ones in our phones, no doubt meticulously rendered by a team of design scientists in some sleek, faraway tech complex. Relic is a line of white marble stones carefully arranged by size on a vellow shelf. The yellow shelf is a speech bubble (clear acrylic), but the marble stones are like speech bubbles, too, growing ever softer to a whisper, and ever larger, like a SHOUT. This anything-goes approach interacts seamlessly with Ripple's, as he seems to have no boundaries whatsoever when it comes to medium For instance, status update is a selection of dirt mounds scattered around the gallery floor, each framing a plain piece of paper with a written message. One features an eyeball and the words WE WATCHED THE DRIFT OF EACH GAZES INTERSECT, or something to that effect, and is arranged beneath a drip in the gallery ceiling, so that a small leaf has grown from the soil. Ripple combines the aura of nature with the aura of script - an odd, threatening scrawl like some psychotic ransom note - in a way that seems barely under control. Thank God for that. I can hardly stand art that is controlled to death. Ripple's piece, with its striving green leaf, is literally life. It is the kind of outrageous dare that made me want to make and look at art in

Ripple also has a series of pieces one can request by text. For suburban dads ... their drone copters and their daughters, the artist replies to the texted request with a recording of a man who describes flying his drone copter in a park on a beautiful day. uh huh is a panting, manipulated excerpt from a Pixies song. Ripple encourages participation by writing his phone number like bathroom graffiti all over the walls of the gallery. On one wall, the numbers are painted large and black. In many other places, the numbers are written in pencil, along with numerous floating eyeballs, a creepy nod to voyeurism and the surveillance state.

"textscape" is one of the stronger shows I've seen in a while, messy and clean, consistent and surprising, philosophical and entertaining. The DEMO Gallery itself is an exceptional space, and, unfortunately, a temporary one, which means there is only so much time to experience it before it's gone - much like texts themselves. In recent years, texting has become my preferred method of communication, easier than having to actually talk to a person. "textscape" somehow managed to make me feel both ashamed of this, and comforted. This is our world, it suggests. How silly! Now let us all embrace it. - Sam Anderson-Ramos



DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Green's Sausage House is the shopping mall of Zabcikville. The long, low, ranch-house-style building surrounded by fields on TX-53 is a cafe, bakery, meat market, deer processor, grocery store, and if you include the gimme caps, a haberdashery.

You wouldn't be faulted if you hadn't heard of the ghost town of Zabcikville. At best, the settlement 10 miles east of Temple was never very big. The area was settled by Czech and German farmers around the time Texas became a state in 1845. Besides only having a few residents, according to Patricia Benoit of the Temple Daily Telegram, the name of the town changed with the owner of the only store in town. Over the years it was known as Kocenda, Lugoville, and Marekville.

In 1923, Frank Zabcik bought the saloon and general store, and attached his name to the community. When the highway was built in 1932, he added a stucco service station and general store to the town. He also started a cafe across the road. Jerome and Della Green began running the cafe for Zabcik in 1946. Today, their sons, Marvin and Charles, continue the tradition of making sausages, slicing steaks, baking kolaches, and bottling dozens of kinds of pickles and sauces.

The restaurant attracts a loyal following of locals and folks just passing through. "A lot of people stop coming or going to the VA hospital in Temple," the waitress said. "It's either their first or last chance to get a good meal."

Green's Sausage House is at 16483 TX-53, technically in Temple. The cafe and market are open daily except Sunday. For their hours, go to www.greenssausagehouse.com.

UPSCALE TEX-MEX JOINT IS A MINI VACATION

It's not easy guessing what Austin wants in a restaurant these days. The current climate of openings and closings only narrows the formula by a series of contradictions. We Austinites like to think of ourselves as cosmopolitan eaters as long as the food remains accessible. We love to drink as long as it's not from a fussy wine program. We like small plates, but just as often like to complain about their lack of value. It's a shifting proposition, seemingly recalculated after every quarter. The only sure bet is that when a restaurant is deemed hot, we are loath to admit to our friends that we haven't eaten there.

Grizzelda's owner Adam Jacoby seems to navigate that push-pull better than many of the young guns currently on the scene. I suspect that some of that has to do with him being an avid diner. For a period of time, I would see him and now-husband Kris Swift (the designer behind Grizzelda's and Jacoby's Restaurant & Mercantile) at almost every new restaurant I was checking out. I'm sure that pace has slowed now that they are running two restaurants and a new trailer (the burger-focused Jacoby's Just Casual at the Southpark Meadows Little Woodrow's), but they both still seem to approach running a restaurant from the customer's point of view.

When it comes to the environment, that means that the dining room and adjacent

patio are geared toward 2017's click-happy culture. Swift's jumble of patterns and textures may be a bit maximalist for some tastes, but all that pea-

cocking is refreshing in Austin's collage of painted geometry and reclaimed wood. And there's no denying that the atmosphere gets the iPhones clicking. The left and right walls' palm frond wallpaper gives the room a Lilly Pulitzer cheerfulness. Inches away, a high-contrast floral lends moody elegance to a corner nook. Elsewhere, there's marble and tile and distressed wood and gold metal and parquet and granny patchwork and shocking pink glass. It's a lot, but it's leavened by expanses of white.

Recently, a crop of Austin hot spots have left it at that – letting the gorgeous space do all of the talking. That's always a danger with restaurants that are not chefdriven, but Grizzelda's finds a middle ground (and besides, Austin needs another New American restaurant like it needs another sound ordinance). Nothing coming out of the

kitchen fully qualifies as innovative, but both executive chef Albert Gonzalez (formerly at Apothecary) and chef de cuisine Austin Ewald work comfortably within the vernacular, blending coastal and Interior Mexican with Tex-Mex. It's all easily understood but thoughtful.*

A good chunk of the offerings can be summarized as chips and dips, which is as populist as you can get. The plain guacamole (\$9) is a bit heavy-handed with lime, but the "de la casa" version (\$11) cuts that with salt from the crumbled bacon and ricottaesque requesón cheese. The queso (\$9) is good if not revelatory; adding picadillo (\$3) is a good if now wholly necessary idea. The lavish creaminess of the avocado and aïoli make the tostadas de atún (\$18) a study in contrasts, separating the hard crunch of the chips from the soft crumble of the fried shallots. Quotidian and straightforward, the black bean tostaditas (\$10) don't break any rules, but there's no point in nachos being prone to rebellion. Still, the fire-roasted tomatoes gently nudged the dish out of the ball park.

Moving on from crisps – the tacos are not deconstructed as you might have heard, but they are plated preciously. The worst offender, the pollo (\$13) seems to be taken off the menu (please reserve the ring molds for pastry), but corn husk cradles still preen. Luckily, that doesn't detract from the house-made tor-

tillas (a rarity in these parts) or the strong flavors – especially in the exuberantly spiced picadillo (\$15) and the smoldering birria de res (\$19), made with dry-aged Jacoby beef. Served

in a splayed graffiti eggplant, the verdura taco (\$16) missed a few of its marks: its near-black mole not quite gelling with the shredded brussels sprouts. Vegetarians be damned, bring back the deshebrada (\$19, but also on hiatus) and its vibrant caper mojo. And besides, everything on the vegetales list – especially the elotes-style street sprouts (\$10) and the guajillo tossed coliflora frito (\$7) – outshines the verduras anyway.

There are only a smattering of proper entrées. The verduras mole is better served with a brined chicken (\$24), the chile relleno (\$19) experiments with plantains, and the pozole (\$16) makes one beg for an added brunch service. And the tres leches cake (\$11) makes a suitable denouement, even if the thought of margarita air makes me shudder. But the frenetic, loud dining room and the charming front-of-house staff give

Grizzelda's the feel of a lively beachside bar, not a place for dinner proper.

But in 2017's anxiety swamp, that's probably what we need out of our dining scene – agave spirit-based cocktails like the pisco/mezcal Bad Girl Ri Ri (\$11) and the allspice CDMX with smoked rosemary (\$13) to make the din louder with each round, chips and salsa to eat by the handful. Turns out that, as always, Austin just wants a patio and a good, strong margarita.

Maybe this guessing game is much easier than it seems. – Brandon Watson

Note: And, yes, pricey. Normally, I don't really see it as my place to discuss price in reviews other than in the parentheticals. Dining is entertainment, and whether those who can afford it choose to spend a buck on concert tickets or a meal is not my concern.

But it does bother me that the accusations of Grizzelda's being overpriced seem louder than the same howls at, say, Eberly. It speaks to how we view the culinary traditions of people of color. The widespread belief that brown peoples' food should be cheap keeps immigrant restaurateurs charging far below what their food is worth. Jacoby comes from relative privilege - and no doubt the money spent on the interior and on employing trained chefs helps with the ability to eke out a little more margin - but I wonder how many of the people on Yelp decrying the prices have any inkling of who runs the place. The fact is that a Oaxacan mole is as difficult to get right as any French sauce, requiring dozens of ingredients. \$24 is perfectly reasonable for a chicken dish featuring it, and few would blink at the same price for coq au vin. Assigning more worth to food the closer it gets to whiteness is bullshit.



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

t 9am on a chilly February Saturday, 40 amateur meat enthusiasts gather at the Texas Beef Council for a workshop led by self-proclaimed "hardcore carnivore" Jess Pryles. The crowd has traveled from as far as Vermont, ranging from ranchers to backyard cooks to veteran pitmasters. It skews heavily male, with an impressive percentage sporting Yeti drinkware. It's the first time Pryles has hosted a workshop, but it doesn't show. By the end of the four-hour session, they'll know enough beef facts to impress the hell out of their friends and will likely never buy an overpriced tenderloin ever again.

Jess Pryles first visited Austin from her home in Melbourne in 2009, and at times a heavy Australian accent still pokes out. Her odyssey into the professional food world began with a beef rib from the now-defunct Artz Rib House on South Lamar.

"We didn't have smoked meats like that in Australia. That barky, peppery, beefy extremeness. I always loved when Mom would make lamb chops, gnawing at the little crispy bits at the end that were rendered and delicious. This was like a whole rib of that," says Pryles.

That aha bite of beef led her to build a website devoted to an unapologetic love of all things meaty. She still lived in Australia, but kept returning to Austin in order to stay abreast of the Central Texas brisket boom. Then in 2015, she took the plunge and became a U.S. citizen and resident Austinite in order to commit herself fully to studying and advocating the consumption of smoked proteins. Fast-forward two years and she's designed a signature model of offset smoker, is regularly booked for TV appearances, signed a book deal, and sells an internationally distributed line of steak rubs.

It's a Cinderella story that most people would love to emulate, turning a passion for food into a career. It might seem like easy money - dream up recipes for al pastor wontons and watch the product endorsement money roll on in. Haters might decry that anyone can do it, that food personalities like Pryles have just weaseled their way into monetizing the same barbecue pics that every person in line at Franklin Barbecue would take. And she's the first to admit that there are shortcuts.

"There's two approaches; one is to take the quick and easy route. Play the SEO game, do whatever you can to grow Instagram followers, be it reposting or using bots. The other is to look at it like a long-term brand project," says Pryles.

Pryles has taken the long route, which means studying under industry heavyweights and building a legit website full of practical and polished content. Stories like a first-timer's guide to hunting, bacon curing tips, or a day in the life of the pitmaster at Stiles Switch. Some posts are sponsored. like a Meat Lover's Guide to Uvalde County, but there aren't any ads or linkshares cluttering up the page. It has the look and feel of a trusted resource, not a generic Wordpress skin. One of her biggest suggestions for anyone looking to enter the world of food media is to invest in a professional site.

How to Cook Meat and Influence People

Jess Pryles and the making of an Austin food celebrity

When it comes to social media, Instagram is key. Pryles boasts 46k followers, a respectable number, but it's not a blockbuster following. Thankfully these days when brands consider investing in content creators, it's not necessarily the size of the audience, but engagement. A photo of the 60-day dryaged hunk of beef used in her workshop scored over 2,200 likes. Pryles politely declined to talk numbers, but another local Instagrammer explained that an industry formula for sponsorship is to average the number of likes on your past 10 posts, then multiple that by a base rate (often \$1). The numbers obviously differ based on campaigns, and it's a stretch to say one rib eye photo is paying Pryles' mortgage for the month, but the figures are enough to make me realize I should probably start using more hashtags.

Thankfully for the attendees of the workshop, Pryles does more than just gaming Instagram all day. Anyone can pick the perfect filter for a beef rib, but you can't hire an Instagram bot to saw into a subprimal in front of 40 men, remove the top blade roast, and fillet two flat iron steaks (cuts nearly as succulent as the tenderloin, but at a fourth of the cost). It's this type of expert authenticity that has drawn attention from legit industry partners like the Texas Beef Council.

"We know that it's a little bit hard to choose different beef cuts at the store," says Rachel Chou, senior communications manager at the TBC. "How to cook them and season them is a complicated process, so we want to work with people that can break down those barriers."


As promised, the workshop does just that. I'd personally consider myself an informed carnivore, but the four-hour session proved otherwise. Beforehand, if you'd asked me at what age cattle live to before becoming beef, I wouldn't have even had a guess. Turns out it only takes between 18-24 months to grow calves to an industry standard of approximately 1,150 pounds, 62% of which is usable meat. That growing period means that the industry requires about three years to adjust to any dramatic changes in demand, like when Arby's announced a brisket sandwich in 2013 and threw barbecue margins into a tailspin.

Granted a curious Google could solve this type of mystery, the real strengths of the workshop are the hands-on elements. Explaining the meaning of the terms on meat packaging in the grocery store is one thing, but without a side-by-side taste test. it's hard to see past the marketing.

"Every single steer in the U.S. is grassfed," says Pryles. "When you see grass-fed, that means as much as Black Angus," which is the most common breed in the U.S.


But grass-finished is another story. A blind tasting left the attendees split in preference between the grain- and grass-finished, with some preferring the roasty and fattier taste of grain, others gravitating toward the buttery and earthy taste of grass. The crowd was more united when it came to USDA quality, with a near-unanimous preference for prime over select and choice. The samples were tasted unsalted, which exposed soapy and musty flavors in the lower quality cuts. Pryles also shared the grading rubrics used by USDA inspectors and displayed uncooked fillets that showed clear differences in marbling.

The workshop concluded with some oldfashioned grilling. Attendees mixed a bottle of their own rub from a table of 15 spices, then used it to season flat iron steaks. Or if you preferred, everyone's gift bag included a bottle of Pryles' signature Hardcore Carnivore rub, which features activated charcoal to give even pan-seared meat a gritty bark. I didn't see anyone reach for the Hardcore Carnivore at their grill stations. but folks didn't fly from as far as Vermont to emulate Pryles. They came to be inspired by her and take their own cooking to the next level. It's hard to say whether anyone other than their friends and family will take note, but if nothing else, they'll score a few extra likes.





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When Death Is on the Line

THIS YEAR'S BANFF LINEUP OFFERS A PLETHORA OF THRILLS AND CHILLS

What is it, exactly, that inspires a person to jump from the tallest peak in the Americas, harnessed only to a thin piece of fabric? Adrenaline plays a role, and many adventure sport athletes could probably check "thrillseeking behavior" off on a psychological evaluation, but it's more than that. Risking life and limb to witness firsthand the majesty of a mountain range from an aerial view only a handful of humans on Earth have seen, or volunteering to kayak a river that likely travels underground through decidedly lethal pathways, or playing a musical instrument while suspended thousands of feet above the ground - these are actions requiring not only athleticism and courage, but conviction. It's the belief that nature provides the ultimate backdrop for a robust life, and that full immersion is imperative.

"This festival provides a passport to the world beyond Texas. The films curated bring viewers face-to-face with dramatic scenery, epic adventure, and daredevil sports. That's the power of the arts. They give the opportunity to experience something new, something unexpected, something transformed. They inspire and encourage us to take action and to get out of our comfort zone," explains Whole Earth Provision Co. founder/owner

Billed as a showcase of the world's best mountain films, the Banff Mountain Film Fest lineup features 18 films this year, screening over two nights – World Tour and Radical Reels – at the beloved Paramount Theatre. Topics range from falconry to Iranian skiing, but all fall under the overarching theme of

mountain sports and unanimous adoration of outdoor adventure.

Sure to be a crowd favorite, the 25-minute tour edit of "Dog Power" highlights the incredible athleticism of human's best friend. Described as "living, breathing, moving art," the dogs run at high speeds for miles on sometimes treacherous terrain, but it's the scenes of meaningful relationships between

sled-dog and musher that really tug the heartstrings. In a five-minute doc, "Devotion: Libby Peter," the world-class climber offers poignant reflections on the correlation between motherhood and climbing. She says, "I want [my daughters] to discover who they are, what makes them feel truly alive, and be true to that. Anything else will feel inferior, pointless even."

Several of the films serve as timely reminders that we're really just guests on this planet. In "The Super Salmon," named for a Susitna River-dwelling fish fitted with an electronic tracking device, the passion of folks like Mike Wood, president of the Susitna River Coalition, is a powerful testament to the intensity of maintaining healthy relationships between government and nature. "We owe it to the river," he says.

One of the most riveting films in the lineup, "Locked In" follows a team of extreme kayakers hellbent on completing (er, surviving) a 13-day descent deep within Papua New Guinea's rain forest. Ominous music dials up the suspense and lovely shots of the white-capped, rushing river set the stage for what could be the most exhilarating (or deadly) ride of a lifetime. "The Fledglings" offers some comic relief when a professional climbing duo jumps headfirst into paragliding: "The sky will slap you down like you've never been slapped before." Newly addicted to "sky crack," these sky ninjas show the beauty of being a beginner again. Mountain bikers take on the Caucasus Mountains in "The Trail to Kazbegi," and summarily describe so many of these films' walkaway moral: "Some suffering, some pain, a fair amount of laughs, and a lot of hard work. That's what it always takes, right?"

THE RISE AND FALL OF ANDY PARIS: THE BUBBLE GUM KING


Some remarkable moments in Texas history are unfairly forgotten, while others end up stuck to the sole of your brand-new kicks, or in your little brother's hair. Austin filmmaker and musician John Paris has spent over a decade working to ensure that the story of his father, Andy Paris, isn't overlooked when it comes time to tally the truly ingenious minds of the 20th century.

His documentary, Andy Paris: The Bubble Gum King, isn't just about how Paris senior completely cornered the bubble gum market during the stateside rationing era of World War II, when sugar and sweets were in drastically low supply, although that's part of it. The Andy Paris story is a genuine rags-to-riches to IRS audits all-American tale, complete with briefcases stuffed full of cash, Mexican pistoleros, midnight border runs in a snazzy Caddy, and the Spanish-fluent son of Greek immigrants manufacturing mountains of the chewy, gooey, DayGlo pink candy in McAllen, Texas, with the help of his all-Mexican workforce and investors. Did I mention the dashing Paris – he resembles no one so much as The Thin Man-era William Powell - also dated Marilyn Monroe and was "the most photographed man in America" two years running, this in addition to making the cover of Life magazine? Also of note: He taught Natalie Wood to blow the finest quality bubbles with his trademark chew. You can't make this stuff up.

"Growing up, I wasn't even aware of this." says John Paris. "Then one weekend when I was in sixth grade, I was down with the flu and my mom pulled out all the scrapbooks and some old films and it just blew my mind. I was floored at how famous he was. He was huge. He was like a confectionery Elvis!"

During the war years, Andy Paris was as revered a business figure as Texas had ever produced and his manufacturing and marketing acumen reflect a time when relationships between Mexico and El Norte were far more hospitable.

"While this film is not overtly political," Paris notes, "I'd like the takeaway to be that we should be friends with Mexico and Mexicans. I think my movie's pretty timely for what's going on in politics these days. But they are my people. If my dad hadn't been able to get the latex from Mexico to make the



gum, and then make the raw ingredients in Monterrey, this movie couldn't exist."

So has John Paris ever had a chance to sample his father's famous product?


"Nope," he admits. "There wasn't any left by the time I came along and discovered my father's backstory. I have found about three pieces on eBay, along with some of his boxes and all kinds of Paris Bubble Gum artifacts."

And has he dared to unwrap one of his finds and attempt to blow an honest-togoodness Paris bubble?

"Shit no, it's like 70 years old," Paris laughs. "It's fossilized; it's hard as a rock. The pink bubble gum ends up turning a terra cotta color. One fascinating thing is that I did open one of the pieces and it was the rare licorice-flavored gum, and that's black as coal. That idea of his failed because people just didn't want to chew black bubble gum in the South at that time."

A Horror Comedy That Bites Back

Jordan Peele injects his genre exercise with social insight

GET OUT

Jordan Peele (one half of the sadly defunct comedy show Key & Peele) makes an auspicious debut as a writer/director with the horror film Get Out. This movie is more of a psychological thriller than an out-andout horror spectacle; blood and guts aren't spilled until the film's final act, at which point the story's closely held secrets also come tumbling forth. Not only does this genre exercise deliver the little jolts D: Jordan Peele; with Daniel Kaluuya, and inside laughs that keep Allison Williams, Catherine Keener, modern horror fans pleased, Bradley Whitford, Caleb Landry Jones, Betty Gabriel, Marcus Henderson, Get Out is also one of the Lakeith Stanfield, Stephen Root, Lil Rel smartest, funniest, and most Howery, Erika Alexander. (R, 103 min.) socially astute films to come around in a while. Entrenched

and perceived racism are put under the microscope, and then spattered to the four corners of the screen. The pernicious evil of racism lies at the crux of the movie, and even though escape may be possible, total eradication may require many more sequels (or social intervention).

> Chris Washington (Kaluuya) is a young black man and photographer who is accompanying his white girlfriend Rose Armitage (Williams) on a weekend trip to meet her parents, Missy

> > (Keener) and Dean (Whitford), for the first time. Chris is a bit worried that Rose hasn't informed them ahead of time that her boyfriend is black, and once he arrives at their remote country home, the unsettling demeanors of the Armitages' black servants.

Georgina (scene-stealing Gabriel) and Walter (Henderson), put Chris further on edge. Even though Missy and Dean are good liberals, their attempts to make Chris comfortable stirs in him a sense of little micro-affronts, and the friends and neighbors who attend the Armitages' strange lawn party further prod the embers. All this tension is not helping Chris in his desire to guit smoking, but Missy, who is a psychiatrist, offers him help in the form of a hypnotherapy session. (Note: Beware doctors offering free treatments.) Ultimately, all the fears that Peele sets up in the first two acts of Get Out come home to roost in the third.

Much of the film's apprehension builds through our observation of Chris trying to decide if he's justified or overreacting to the little breaches he experiences in this enclave of rich, white privilege. Are the many little odd things he witnesses meant as intentional slights or are they merely caused by his heightened racial perceptions? This is the delicious dilemma at the heart of the movie, and is part of the social contract that lulls Chris into acquiescence until it's clear the time has come for revolt. Chris' best friend Rod Williams (Howery), with whom he inter-

acts mostly by phone, is a TSA agent who serves as both the movie's comic relief and common sense. Rod would be the guy in your row at the movie theatre shouting "Get out!" to the characters. On the other hand, scenes with Rose's brother Jeremy (Jones) seem like they're cut from another movie. Additionally, the pre-credits sequence would benefit from better integration into the story, however the sequence's evocation of the opening of Halloween is a signal to the many other film tributes scattered throughout. (In addition to John Carpenter, the sensibility of uncertainty that marks novels like Ira Levin's Rosemary's Baby and The Stepford Wives are evident everywhere.) Peele clearly knows his genre formulas, but moreover has a keen sense of how to make them speak to the present.

BITTER HARVEST

Ukraine has been much in the news of late. Vladimir Putin's annexation of Crimea and the resulting ongoing political skirmishes and decidedly non-pro-Ukraine Russian intentions have (one hopes) brought the country back into the minds of freedom-loving peoples everywhere. Not so much in the U.S., where the bizarre love triangle between President Donald Trump, Putin, and President Donald Trump is keeping late-night television hosts in the dystopian comedy pink while the rest of the world gnaws its nails to the quick. The period drama Bitter Harvest initially has the feel of anti-Russian propaganda, but in truth, it's a history lesson wrapped up in a romance, gallows grim but far too often unnecessarily heavy-handed in a way that drives home the factual historical horrors it portrays while somehow managing to feel like a sizably budgeted but no less maladroit television movie of the week.

Set in a picturesque peasant farming community just outside of Kiev, Bitter Harvest sets up a fated-at-birth (okay, adolescence) love story between Max Irons' Yuri and his childhood sweetheart Natalka (Samantha Barks). Foreshadowing arrives early on during a traditional "Will I get married?" ritual

as Natalka's candlelit crown drifts across a midnight pond and then sinks without a trace while an old crone averts her gaze. So, clearly, things are not going to end well, but just how bad the situation becomes is only made clear in the real world after the fall of the Soviet Union in 1991.

As it happens, the unsuspecting young lovers are about to fall victim to Stalin's mass-murdering collectivism of 1932-33, during which Bolshevik soldiers confiscated the whole of the Ukrainian wheat harvest, leaving the entirety of the nation to starve to death. a U.N.-recognized catastrophe known in its native tongue as Holodomor, or "death by hunger." Estimates of the dead range wildly from 2.5 to 10 million, making this one of the most extreme state-sanctioned acts of terror in human history.

The peasants revolt, of course, although their sabers and farm implements are no match for Stalin's killers, who mow them down with belt-fed machine guns when they're not shooting priests in the head. The great Terence Stamp (The Limey) gives a typically fine performance as Yuri's grandfather, a legendary warrior who can still ride a stallion sidesaddle when called upon to battle it out with the Bolsheviks, but even he cannot save Bitter Harvest from its many inherent flaws, which include some ridiculously mawkish cinematography from the usually fantastic Douglas Milsome (of Kubrick's The Shining and Full Metal Jacket fame) and the inescapable fact that the 90-plus-minute running time is simply too brief to allot enough time for character development, much less a comprehensive overview of the epic tragedy that surrounds the doomed love story. This would have been far more effective had it been an actual, binge-worthy Netflix/Amazon/Hulu series, although goofy acting kudos to Gary Oliver's portrayal of Stalin as a mustache-twiddling villain straight out of the Snidely Whiplash zone. - Marc Savlov

LINKLATER'S BEFORE TRILOGY COMES TO CRITERION

Having classified the Before Trilogy as both a personal favorite and a mark of excellence in filmmaking, I jumped at the opportunity to write about the collector's set (finally) being released on Blu-ray for the Criterion Collection. Sitting down with the discs, analyzing the special feature conversations, and then rediscovering scenes already seared into my brain, however, reminded me how powerful these films are. How can you capture a series that morphs beautifully every time you screen it?

Hometown hero Richard Linklater's classic movies Dazed & Confused, Slacker, and Boyhood are all already members of the elite Criterion club, but Before Sunrise, Before Sunset, and Before Midnight just joined the roster, and as a first-time box set. The set's multimedia special features include Athina Rachel Tsangari's new documentary, After Before (about the making of Before Midnight



in Greece), an essay by critic Dennis Lim with photograph stills, and an episode of NPR's Fresh Air with Terry Gross hosting Linklater, along with Ethan Hawke and Julie Delpy. Several other interviews lend insight and insider information, and the 2016 full-length documentary. Richard Linklater: dream is destiny, by Karen Bernstein and the Chronicle's own Louis Black (co-founder and co-editor) is an added bonus.

Intricate in its simplicity, the trilogy, shot in nine-year intervals, is primarily driven by incredibly well-written dialogue performed by Hawke and Delpy, who completely embody their roles as Jesse and Celine. The strolling conversations, which become more poignant with every screening, are philosophical explorations about the fundamental elements of life: time, love, and death. Linklater's scripts grasp how both strangers and lovers speak to each other, how romance is both thwarted and enhanced by spatial restrictions, and how age has everything and nothing to do with the way we love another person. The negative space between the lines of Jesse and Celine's relationship is almost as important as the oceanic waves of words: Thoughtful moments of silence in passionate companionship are vital, too. We're reminded by watching this pair exist in specific moments in time - across decades - that the most romantic thing about love is its fluidity.

Like holding a treasure chest containing a beloved sliver of the silver screen, this box set is tangible evidence of an incredible love story spanning nearly 20 years, and much more aesthetically pleasing than that old shoebox full of love letters in the closet.

with the remaining six deadly sins.) Of course, everything has its Kryptonite, in this case a magnetic ore that can temporarily pacify the beasts' lethal urges. Zhang stages the battle scenes between the Chinese warriors and the otherworldly trespassers with a balletic sense of pageantry (the cobalt blue-clad female archers bungee jumping from the Wall's turrets are breathtaking), but the esteemed filmmaker of such masterworks as Raise the Red Lantern, To Live, and Hero seems hobbled by the genrebending narrative. What might have been weirdly compelling instead feels barely a cut above an L. Ron Hubbard science-fiction novel. As the European mercenary trader search-

ing northern Asia for a mysterious "black powder" with the power to revolutionize warfare, Damon appears disengaged through much of the film, seemingly reluctant to step into the boots of the white-guy savior (sorta) who helps his new comrades fend off their savage nemesis. It's hard to say what's more distracting here: the actor's lackadaisical commitment to the role or the ratty extensions in his hair. Damon is usually a reliable (and often fine) actor, but The Great Wall doesn't appear to be his cup of tea. Even the Butch Cassidy/ Sundance Kid bantering with his Latin sidekick (Chilean actor Pascal) - something you'd think Damon could do in his sleep - lacks the typical vitality. Whether it's a case of miscasting is unclear, but without a willing hero to anchor this already dubious movie from start to finish. The Great Wall hits a brick wall.


Just like Jenny, in the anthemic song written by Lou Reed and performed by the Velvet Underground and so many other bands, Bodi's "life was saved by rock & roll." Bodi (voiced by Wilson) is this animated film's titular rock dog, a young Tibetan mastiff who lives on Snow Mountain, where he and all the other dogs guard the village's woolmaking sheep from invasion by a predatory wolf pack. Bodi's father Khampa (Simmons) rigorously trains the young pups in their protective tasks, and banishes all music and other activities that are extraneous to the allparamount defense of Snow Mountain. Then one day a radio falls from an airplane passing overhead, and the music it emits changes Bodi's life forever. It takes only a few power chords for the young dog to hear his calling. Now, in order to pursue his dream of rockstar glory, Bodi must defy his father's wishes and move to the big city, a plot dynamic even

Although the plot is thin, Rock Dog nevertheless charms with its engaging central characters and unencumbered storyline. The animation is unexceptional, but by keeping its focus on the characters, the artwork remains perfectly acceptable. The wolf pack that's itching to conquer Snow Mountain seems like an unnecessary subplot but is kept to a minimum, depicting them as a bigcity mob enterprise headed by Linnux (Black, who mostly shouts into a phone receiver). Fleetwood Yak (Elliott) is the mountain's wise elder, who narrates the story. The friends whom Bodi bonds with once he arrives at

Rock and Roll Park, a freewheeling buskers' paradise in the city, are a winsome mix of sweet and sour: bass-player Darma (Whitman) and stoned drummer Germur (Garcia) become concerned friends, while obnoxious lead guitarist Trey (Dillon) is a hilarious send-up of a rock & roll egotist. But most of the jokes go to the story's rock god Angus Scattergood (Izzard), a cat who lives in a mansion on a hill and is currently suffering from songwriter's block despite his massively successful previous output. With naive temerity, Bodi invades Angus' seclusion, seeking advice and guitar lessons, and following some initial skirmishes, a song is born.

Released last summer in China, Rock Dog became the victim of an unrelated battle between distributors, which had the effect of canceling most of its screenings. Hoping to start afresh with this U.S. release, Rock Dog should be able to snarf up some box-office kibble on these shores. For every kid harboring dreams of rock stardom (and I suppose that's every one of them), Rock Dog pleasantly unleashes the fantasy.

2017 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT **FILMS: ANIMATION**

D: Various. (NR, 90 min.)

As befits their nominations for an Academy Award, the five chosen short films all boast some excellence in whichever style of animation - CG, woodcut, traditional cel - and storytelling they employ. Andrew Coats and Lou Hamou-Lhadj's "Borrowed Time" features a battered old CG sheriff in the American West coming to terms with - for want of a better term - cowboy PTSD stemming from his reckless youth. "Pearl," directed by Patrick Osborne, crams a whole lifetime's worth of father-daughter love and wellbusked music into a brief six minutes. Theodore Ushey's 'Blind Vaysha" tells the story of a young girl who sees the past in her left eye and the future in her right, while Pixar's predictably adorable "Piper" features a sandpiper mother teaching her hatchling how to dig for clams. Running at 35 minutes, "Pear Cider and Cigarettes" is a noirish story of a down-and-out hadly in need of a liver transplant. It's the most ambitious of this year's nominees, although each is engrossing, with their own distinct styles and tones. (02/10/2017)

2017 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT FILMS: DOCUMENTARIES -PROGRAMS A & B

D: Various. (NR. 80 min.)

Program A features Dan Krauss' "Extremis" and Kahane Cooperman's "Joe's Violin." The end-of-life decisions that are the subject of "Extremis" take place in the intensivecare unit of a single public hospital. The film highlights the choices made by patients and their families regarding the insertion of assistive breathing tubes to keep a patient alive when all signs of progressive organ failure are evident. It's a reminder that there really is no such thing as a good death. As "Joe's Violin" concerns the actions of a Holocaust survivor, it may stand the strongest chance for an Oscar win (as Holocaust subject matter is proven Oscar catnip). The subject, Joe Feingold, responds to a call from WQXR, New York City's classical radio station, for used musical instruments to be donated to public schoolchildren. Joe donates the violin he's owned since he traded a carton of cigarettes for it while living in a displaced persons camp after the war. He gets to meet the inspiring young girl who receives the instrument, and we learn about the unusual Bronx school for immigrant girls that she attends. In its way, it's another story about two refugee lives.

Program B features Orlando von Einsiedel's "The White Helmets" and Marcel Mettelsiefen's "Watani: My Homeland," both of which deal with the consequences of the Syrian civil war. Set in Aleppo as the violence there intensified in early 2016, "The White Helmets" highlights the work of this volunteer organization, whose members run into the rubble caused by airstrikes, digging out living and dead civilians. The film presents a ground-level view of their work. "Watani: My Homeland" also begins in Aleppo and reveals the harsh reality of a married couple and their four children. Devoted to the resistance, the parents try to shield their children from the daily bombard-

ments by both the Syrian army and the ISIS fighters, but after the husband and father are taken captive, the mother makes a decision to flee with her children toward the hope of a better life in Germany. With this microcosmic look at one family, the filmmaker manages to reveal much about the modern-day refugee crisis. (02/10/2017) - Marjorie Baumgarten VIOLET CROWN

2017 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT **FILMS: LIVE ACTION**

D: Various. (NR, 134 min.)

When it comes to naming its best feature nominees, the Academy Awards famously has a bias against comedy. That bias trickles down to the live-action short films category, as well; this latest batch of nominees are worthy, certainly, if trending toward drear. What these shorts do very well is speak to our times, with stories of resistance, refugees, and anxiety over our ever-advancing technology. The highlight is Sélim Azzazi's "Ennemis Intérieurs," a monstrously tense back-and-forth between two Arab men, as a seemingly innocent interview turns into a witch hunt. Still, I wouldn't be surprised if Timo von Gunten's softie "La Femme et le TGV" takes the prize - mainly due to star Jane Birkin, Namesake of the Hermès bag, former lover of Serge Gainsbourg, she sure curled a lot of toes with her whispery "Je t'aime" back in the day, and it's a treat to see her onscreen again. A CURE FOR WELLNESS

This will not be the movie that sways popular opinion back in favor of director Gore Verbinski following the creative and commercial disaster of his last film, The Lone Ranger. After a confusing opening scene during which the story's MacGuffin keels over while drinking a glass of water, A Cure for Wellness sends its real protagonist, young Mr. Lockhart, to a sanitarium in the Swiss Alps to retrieve the recuperating water imbiber, Mr. Pembroke. Only problem is that Pembroke doesn't want to leave his restorative Magic Mountain, a sinister retreat headed by the very sinister Dr. Volmer. Like The Lone Ranger, the worst misstep taken by Verbinski's new film is its lengthy running time. At 146 minutes, there are just too many scenes with too few payoffs, and even fewer scenes that keep us guessing. The horror at the heart of the film is fairly obvious, and with no characters for whom we have a rooting interest, A Cure for Wellness is as difficult to swallow as castor oil. (02/17/2017)

While Hidden Figures is likable and illuminating, it is, nevertheless, routine and predictable. Competent and heartwarming, director Theodore Melfi's technique seems better suited to the TV-movie-of-the-week format than big-screen storytelling. Haitian filmmaker Peck blends an array of historical and contemporary footage, film and television clips, still photographs, written words onscreen, and music with Baldwin's words to excavate the roots of America's self-perpetuating fantasy of itself. Baldwin is a writer whose work belongs on every bookshelf in America, and now with this film, his words can be heard on every movie screen in the land. Director/screenwriter Jenkins divides his focal character's life into three chapters, each corresponding to the name or nickname (Little, Chiron, Black) defining him at a specific age. While all of the performances in this movie are superb. Naomie Harris' turn as Chiron's mother in the third act is hands-down award-worthy. But the third act's final scene between the grown-up Chiron and former crush Kevin (Holland) is the film's beautiful centerpiece. It's a heartbreaking moment, and Jenkins stages the entire scene with a palpable sense of unrequited romance. Truly, madly, deeply: There's magic in this Moonlight. Director Morten Tyldum corrals some stunning visuals and doesn't completely whiff at sequentially serving multiple masters, from romance to psychological drama to catastrophe-action as systems start to fail. If only Passengers didn't try to reverse course back toward romance, a ship already sailed. Were this a modest little art film, that morally murky path might be applauded as subversive. To continue the thought experi-

THE RED TURTLE

This near-wordless animated feature tells a simple, almost biblical story. Without any backstory, it opens with a speck of a man bobbing in a great watery expanse. Washed ashore on a deserted tropical island, the bedraggled castaway builds a raft and sets sail for an unknown destination, but is thwarted by an unseen being. On his third unsuccessful attempt he comes eye to eye with the creature, a giant sea tortoise with a majestic scarlet-hued shell. The frustrated man later kills his mystical adversary, only for a beautiful copper-haired woman to emerge, like Botticelli's Venus, from his shell. 

Mosaic Sound Collective **Comes Into Focus**

The Mosaic Sound Collective, a DIY music co-op and creative space conceived by Residual Kid parent Dan Redman, continues to pick up steam as a destination for Austin music businesses (see one half of this week's cover story package, p.54).

No doubt tenants relish the sweet digs: a 25,000-square-foot compound on East MLK, honeycombed with grassy courtyards. Mosaic hasn't hoisted a sign, or hosted a grand opening, but it's filling up with occupants excited about its affordability and communitysustaining model wherein musicians can earn membership through volunteering, then reap discounted services.

Recording studios represent a strong element of Mosaic's early groundswell. Stuart Sullivan, the veteran Austin engineer who's worked closely with the Butthole Surfers. James Cotton, and Sublime, is already operating his Wire Recording Studio inside Mosaic. The collective provided a soft landing after he lost his Downtown facility to skyrocketing rent.

One of his longtime colleagues, Charles **Godfrey**, an in-house engineer for renowned West Texas recording facility Sonic Ranch, moved to Austin last December and caught a glimpse of Mosaic while helping Sullivan move. He was so impressed he's decided to open a studio there too. Godfrev. who's engineered albums by acts like Cannibal Corpse and Yeah Yeah Yeahs as well as Austin bands including **Explosions** in the Sky and the Black

Angels, represents an impressive addition to Austin's recording landscape.

Opening soon at Mosaic, his mixing studio – also featuring recording capabilities will work both separately and potentially in conjunction with projects at Sonic Ranch, where he'll continue to work. The appeal of Mosaic: collaboration.

"Being part of that community is going to be a great way for me to jump into the Austin scene, in a professional sense, outside of Sonic Ranch," he says.

Meanwhile, a variety of other music businesses are descending on Mosaic. Concert equipment provider Capital Radio Backline, run by Transmission Events gear guy Erick Sanger, has set up shop. Peelander-Z frontman Kengo

"Yellow" Hioki maintains an art room and practice space there. Musician

tipping app **TipCow** is leasing office space and working in tandem with Redman on a livestreamed "Mosaic Mondays" series, beginning March 6. Several other businesses in the music tech and studio fields tell "Playback" they're looking at Mosaic but can't announce yet.

Midnight Stroll multi-instrumentalist Jonas Wilson is currently arranging classes for Mosaic's education component. To start. he's offering a four-week practical theory course and private instruction in all areas. Sullivan, meanwhile, heads up studio lessons. Live sound engineer Paul Minor confirms he's interested in bringing his audio classes to Mosaic as well.

White Horse/Hard Luck Lounge co-owner Denis O'Donnell says he's going to be

Mosaic's food and beverage partner, proudly promising a lack of fancy, pretentious, foodie crap - just good eats and drink. That'll serve folks at the 400-600-capacity indoor venue, which will host concerts and, potentially, events serving Austin's venue-challenged theatre community.

Amongst tenants, community partners, and operators, there's suddenly palpable excitement brewing around this project that seemed somewhat subterranean in recent months. There's also tight-lipped anticipation about some game-changing additions that could be announced as soon as next month.

"If Dan Redman accomplishes all the things he's trying to do, they're gonna build a statue for that man - pointing towards the future," grins O'Donnell.

HALF NOTES

TEFLON DON: Two days after resigning in frustration over government bureaucracy, **Don Pitts** agreed to return to the **Music & Entertainment Division** as a consultant through April 29. The city's sentiment was clear: Without Pitts, they'd be up shit creek during South by Southwest. A recently revealed City Auditor's investigation found that he had failed to report wrongdoing after former coordinator Ashley Buchanan filed a fraudulent invoice for \$2,500 attempting to be reimbursed for a trip she took with a vendor that was supposed to come at no cost to the city.

COPS READ CHRON: "Playback's" recent cover story on transient behavior impacting Red River venues inspired new APD Downtown Commander Justin Newsom to meet with area venue owners at Barracuda last Wednesday. Barracuda partner Jason McNeely reports the meeting opened doors for increased communication going forward, while APD's message remained the same: Call the cops when you see something illegal. The **Red River Cultural District** is working toward gating the alleyway between Beerland and Sidewinder, currently a popular place for sex, drugs, and toiletry.

MARGIN WALKER, Austin's largest independent concert promoters, donated profits from last Thursday to the Human Rights Initiative of North Texas and American Gateways in support of Day Without Immigrants - a protest against nationalistic policies.

ADAM TORRES CAME TO SING THE SONG

The title track of Adam Torres' new Fat Possum EP I Came to Sing the Song meditates on the existential meaning of being a songwriter, his voice quavering like a wind instrument over music so delicately atmospheric it's a wonder it can brace such poetic density.

"It's about finding one's purpose," explains the local songwriter. "The song talks about different people and animals, and how it's natural to have this invitation to profess their lives to others and the world."


Twice fluttering into the lyrics is a "bluebird," his family name in honor of his step-grandfather, a Cochiti Pueblo chief of the Santo Domingo tribe. Torres' bloodline turns up both Apache and mestizo. Last year's four-star sophomore LP Pearls to Swine shared that flesh and bone with NPR listeners via All Songs Considered host Bob Boilen and transformed him from opening act to headliner.

Little in the previous decade indicated a promising music career. Shortly

after the release of 2006 bow Nostra Nova, he "departed from the idea of being a touring musician," finished at Ohio University, lived in Ecuador, attended grad school here at UT, and worked water quality studies in the Rio Grande. Throughout that time, Torres hummed hundreds of songs, but only when Pittsburgh indie Misra Records reissued his debut long-player on vinyl in 2015 did the music business beck-

"That was a starting point for me to reconsider how I wanted to play my music and how I wanted to perform at it," he says.

Torres spent most of last year on the road with his band of Austin eclectics: percussionist Thor Harris (ex-Swans), Aisha Burns (Balmorhea), and multiinstrumentalist Dailey Toliver (Molly Burch). The same group cut the session at Erik Wofford's Cacophony **Recorders** that spawned both *Pearls* to Swine and this week's follow-up. At the time, Torres identified those four



tracks' common thread and parceled them out for the EP.

"Pearls to Swine was an outward artist statement," he explains. "I was trying to describe a fictitious setting of the world we inhabit and the idea that people, society, and even nature was devolving to this wasteland. I Came to Sing the Song looks inward. I wrote them with writing in mind. There's some kind of composition element to everything the characters are doing."

Catch Torres Saturday at the Cactus Cafe, a venue where people come to sing the song.

rom outside, the Mosaic Sound Collective doesn't inspire a lot of confidence. The white concrete bunker just east of 183 on MLK once served as a convalescent home and juvenile detention facility. For now, it retains all the charm of its previous applications.

Dan Redman sees something different. As he tours the 25,000-sq.-ft. maze of hallways and rooms, his vision for the space becomes tangible. He points out the wing dedicated to offices and classrooms, rehearsal spaces for bands, and an area dedicated to manufacturing, with plans for screenprinting facilities and vinyl pressing.

Producer Stuart Sullivan has already set up the new home for his Wire Recording Studio in one part of the building, relocating to Mosaic after rent on his former South Lamar studio spiked from \$1,600 a month to \$8,500. Redman continues talks with other producers (see "Playback," p.50), as well as various music businesses and nonprofits, including a new music-tech incubator, to take up residency in the building.

"We want to create a membership-based collective where we have all these resources and services available for artists, while keeping it affordable as a nonprofit," explains Redman, parent to two-thirds of major label ATX grunge trio Residual Kid. "The model is a hybrid for-profit/nonprofit, so we can create the sustainability model and not always be in fundraising mode – actually be able to pay for and fund the nonprofit side.

"And we'll own it," he emphasizes, "so we won't have many of the same issues a lot of clubs and other facilities have had."

Next on Redman's priority list is permitting from the city to create a live music space on the property, as well as food and beverage. He's already secured rezoning of the 7 acres behind the complex for 168 affordable housing units.

Creative industry hubs like Redman's have garnered more attention, and urgency, over the last year as the issue of affordability has taken center stage for the local arts community (revisit "We Can't Make It Here Anymore," May 27, 2016). Last February Mayor Steve Adler put forth the Austin Music & Creative Ecosystem Omnibus Resolution, a creative stimulus package for Austin's music and art sectors. One year later, portions of the resolution are finally being undertaken by the city, if slowly.

When the Economic Development Department delivered its 68-page "Music & Creative Ecosystem Stabilization Recommendations" report to City Council in June, they outlined 10 priorities culled from more than 70 individual recommendations. Those priorities focused on: Affordable Space; Agent of Change Principle; Cultural Tourism; Entertainment License; Incentives, Tools & Loans; Land Use Regulations; Music Genre Development; Permitting & Licensing; Professional Development; and Revenue Development. (See "Omnibus Resolution Report Arrives," June 27, 2016).

"Out of all the recommendations, they've so far tapped three directly," says Music Commission Chair Gavin Garcia, emphasizing that the 2017 city budget focuses specifically on what were determined to be crisis issues for the arts community.

Without catching his breath, on Dec. 26 the mayor posted another proposal, this one a draft resolution pursuing the Music & Creative Ecosystem initiative previously approved by Council, with \$475,000 designated in this year's budget for implementation. Adler's resolution would direct staff to move forward with four elements: 1) a case study for extended venue hours in the Red River Cultural District; 2) \$200,000 in "tranommendations not being addressed. Yet even as those committees begin the process of research and receiving input from stakeholders throughout the city, skepticism of just how effective the city can be in helping spur the creative ecosystem resurfaced with last week's resignation of City Music Manager Don Pitts, specifically citing the challenges of city bureaucracy.

"As a music industry person, I realize I work differently," wrote Pitts in his resignation letter. "I understand why protocol is

sition funding" for performing arts venues; 3) \$75,000 to implement a "Revenue Development Platform"; and 4) \$200,000 for "creation of an Entertainment Services Group and the Nightlight Initiative."

"From the Music Commission's perspective, we were also very satisfied with the mayor's engagement that yielded the Neighborly Challenge \$10 million minibond [see "Crowdfunding Austin Music Venues," Sept. 22, 2016], which underscores his commitment to the local music industry." offers Garcia of the past year's efforts. "And the pilot program for the Red River Cultural District was a win that addresses another hot button issue, which is the survival of incubator venues."

Now Mayor Adler has convened "Phase II" of the Omnibus plan, establishing five municipal groups to take up the other recimportant in the life of a city bureaucracy. and I realize it is time for me to not work within a bureaucracy any longer."

Pitts' exit, due in April after the city made him an interim internal consultant to ease the transition to a new manager, highlights that while Mayor Adler and City Council may aggressively champion efforts to bolster Austin's music scene, their impact can only extend so far against a limited budget, competing city priorities, and the necessary restrictions of bureaucracy.

"The city has been very supportive, Mayor Adler has been great to work with and has endorsed us, but we're not really asking for anything," acknowledges Redman, who has bootstrapped funding for Mosaic himself. "In meeting with the city, our goal has always been that we'd love their voice and advocacy for making this program work, but

I think once you get into the bureaucracy of everything, it's difficult to get things done. The Omnibus Resolution is fantastic, though the actualization is hard."

"What the city, in my belief, can do the most is support infrastructure and the foundational things that then people can lift themselves up with," agrees Sullivan as he shows off his studio. "It's not the city's job to make people successful, but it is the city's job to create the opportunity for individual businesses to be able to come in and be successful."

As the mayor moves into Phase II of the Omnibus plan, distinguishing between where the city can lead in supporting the music community and where it would be more effective in advancing existing projects, will largely determine the impact of its initiatives. The pilot program to extend club hours for the Red River Cultural District and effort to install Agent of Change rules (see "Playback: The Westin Sues the Nook Over Sound," Jan. 6) offer two ideal examples of how the city can best leverage its role. Yet the music community knows it can't simply wait on the city for support, and efforts like Black Fret, Mosaic, and ATX6 have provided templates for necessary new models of public engagement.

"We want to partner with the city," says Chris Brecht, who founded ATX6 three years ago. "We want the city to get behind what we're doing and help us, and maybe make it just a little bit easier with some money that's actually set aside for projects iust like this."

ATX6 reflects one of the Omnibus' priorities in providing an export program for Austin artists (see "The French Connection: ATX6," Sept. 9, 2016). While the project received last minute funding from the city in its initial year to send the group of homegrown musicians to North by Northeast in Toronto, it has since only been able to barely break even through fundraising shows and donations from local venues and businesses, even as it has proven wildly successful in fostering international opportunities for local musicians. Brecht believes support from the city would allow the project to reach its full potential.

"The challenge for the government is to find resources to support the industry, namely monetary, while it takes bows as the most livable city in the U.S.," challenges Garcia. "From my perspective, I see the need for a central advisory or leadership group, like the terrific work of AMP and earlier music commissions, and building on that. Just as the government addresses equity in the city, and the more we can engage communities at large across 10 districts, the more support we'll earn for the industry. There's a serious lack of acknowledgment of how the Austin music industry permeates beyond Downtown, and what it represents to the community's economic health.

"That will be the story of the next year in Austin music, the public sector engaging the Austin music industry like never before. Plus this year, many more City Council members will be taking a public position, whereas the mayor led this first wave."



SHINYRIBS I Got Your Medicine

Funny how we remember music: Emotionally, not literally. First blush of the Southerly Crock-Pot that is I Got Your Medicine - Sun Records, Mardi Gras, South Austin - sepias Shinyribs' three previous albums as raunchy Golden Triangle clambakes. Revisit the kitchen powwow of 2010's Well After Awhile ("Poor People's Store"), Lucinda Williams' funnest album never in Gulf Coast Museum (2013), and the soulful, wall-to-wall hit parade of Okra Candy two years ago, however, and all rightfully ease up from the hootenanny of patriarch Kevin Russell's previous fire drill, the Gourds. Recorded at Houston's landmark Sugar Hill Studios with Oxford, Miss., "catfish music" purveyor Jimbo Mathus of Nineties swing revivalists the Squirrel Nut Zippers, I Got Your Medicine remains laissez-faire in regard to the formula of the locals' potent mash, which takes its oh-so-sweet time on the new disc's miraculous first half. The opening title tie-in sashays straight out of Memphis, smearing organ, horns, an Ikettes harmony come-on, and even some barbecue sauce all over the barroom clutch, while rejoinder "Don't Leave It a Lie" doubles down like a paddle boat on the Mississippi, Shinyribs hitting a swell of sound midway through, wherein the bottom drops out and a symphonic interlude of bass, ukulele, flute, Hawaiian sunset steel, and Russell's tender croon come to the fore. Side one betrays no missteps, zingers including infectious jaunt "Trouble, Trouble" ("Trouble comes at you 100 miles per hour, but trouble just wants to pass/ Trouble don't slow down in the curve, but trouble runs out of gas") and follow-up to Okra's "Donut Taco Palace," a flea market ditty bordering out of novelty into absurdity and thus a pearl in the catalog, "Tub Gut Stomp & Red-Eyed Soul." Time to mixtape Russell's song carnies (i.e., "Bolshevik Sugarcane" from Gulf Coast Museum). Organ-lined



ballad "I Knew It All Along" demonstrates that all those Nathaniel Rateliffs and St. Pauls never met a soul lament they couldn't oversing. And whatever Russell paid harmonic twosome Alice Spencer and Sally Allen wasn't enough. Peak LP Okra Candy fried up all originals, whereas its two predecessors cooked up a choice cover each (Sam Cooke's "A Change Is Gonna Come" and Harold Melvin & the Blue Notes' "If You Don't Know Me By Now," respectively). I Got Your Medicine ladles out three whole tablespoons of drank in the Houstonian Fifties R&B treatment of Ted Hawkins' "I Gave Up All I Had" (whose 2015 tribute Cold and Bitter Tears: The Songs of Ted Hawkins was overseen by Russell), the best version of Allen Toussaint's "A Certain Girl" since the 1965 Yardbirds, and Toussaint McCall's "Nothing Takes the Place of You," one trip to the well too many. The latter pair opens side B, of which the bottom mostly drops out, save for the giggles of "I Don't Give a Shit," twanged banter by the boss and Spencer. Otherwise, there's no glossing over the underwritten "Ambulance" or queso closer "The Cross Is Boss." In time, all will recall I Got Your Medicine as one of Shinyribs' finest elixirs. ADAM TORRES

I Came to Sing the Song EP (Fat Possum)

More than a decade after Adam Torres achieved cult status in small town Athens, Ohio, through 2006 solo debut Nostra Nova, the now local troubadour continues harking back to deeply intimate and rural Americana on I Came to Sing the Song. While the full-length gleaned pop, the new four-track EP serves as an extension of 2016's four-star Pearls to Swine. Cut during those sessions, bare-bones acoustics imagine vast Appalachia terrain and ancient foothills reliant on the grace of God. Torres' evocative timbre and organic instrumentation ride finger-plucked melodies that roll like tumble-

weeds on "Green Mountain Road," and reverb-cloaked guitar strums gasping for air in the pine cone frost of "Hatchet." A soaring falsetto carves jagged mountains in "Spyder Song," trailing through haunting and desolate topography. I Came to Sing the Song traverses landscapes both physical and emotional. BLACK BOOKS Can't Even

Clearly besotted with pre-millennial sounds from the UK underground, local shoegazers Black Books soaks in sonic



storms and dream-pop psychedelia on their long-awaited second LP, Can't Even. Rather than raid its record collection like overeager fan boys, the Austin sextet employs its influences with precision. Gary Numan-esque synthesizer preludes, hooks borrowed from the Verve, and guitar muscle inspired by Catherine Wheel on "Put Your Money Down" amalgamate seamlessly rather than thieve. Melodies often begin gently, dreamily, before rearing up in waves of amplifier squall. Yet no matter how mighty the sonic emissions, the music never drowns out Ross Gilfillan's plaintive moan. The Books encourage a touch of melodrama with their arrangements, allowing pop song "Golden OK" to billow into a lighter app-hoisting anthem and rocker "It Could Be Better" to rage through beautiful fury. Projecting its romantic arc onto an epic widescreen, ballad "Crybaby" achieves the kind of glory that made the kids cry before emo. Holding nothing back, Can't Even belies the emotional repression implied by its title.

CURTIS MCMURTRY

The Hornet's Nest

Exceptional artistry built Curtis McMurtry's DNA, but those coming to this local songcraft

with expectations based on his famous relations are in for a shock. The Hornet's Nest, his second album, finds him erecting a very large tent around what passes for American music and utilizing it to tell inventive stories of everyday life. Most compositions come colored by an acoustic guitar, but he depends on chamber orchestration, including Mother Falcon's Diana Burgess on cello, to create imaginative sound beds featuring trumpet, banjo, upright bass, pedal steel, and clarinet. The results close in on Leonard Cohen at his edgiest ("Tracker") and the sad-eyed folk music favored by Sarah Jarosz ("Bayonet"). He describes The Hornet's Nest as "a play staged in 13 vignettes." Curtis McMurtry's vision, a sort of 21st century blues, moves in resounding ways. (Album release: Cactus

SCOTT H. BIRAM The Bad Testament

(Bloodshot) Ten full-lengths into a nearly 20-year career as

a monolith of punk rock blues, Austin's Scott H. Biram hardly follows a formula. Rural as hell, urban in attitude, Ionesome/orn'ry/mean, The Bad Testament is a primer in sin and redemption, hard love gone wrong, and blues and country influences




pushed to nasty extremes. There's plenty of his trademark busted-speaker distortion and Hasil Adkins-joins-the Sex Pistols spew, with "Trainwrecker" verging on a backwoods version of Motörhead. Yet much of this finds Biram fully utilizing his home studio, sounding at times more like a band, as on "Long Old Time." Several tunes are introduced with samples of a radio spinning through alarmist news reports or gospel preachers (foot stompin' gospel groover "True Religion"). The Bad Testament borders on the biblical, some sorta atonement for a lifetime of bad decisions.

KNIFE IN THE WATER Plays One Sound and Others (Sonic Surgery)

Ahead of next month's first new Knife in the Water release in 14 years. Super Secret Records' reissue imprint Sonic Surgery waxes the local



quintet's 1998 debut back into print and onto turntables. A wandering, Ionesome album, Plays One Sound remains ethereal, understated avant-garde, and noirish, laden with church organ bleakness and the country twang of pedal steel. Eerie opener "One Sound" builds on a thoughtful guitar line and Aaron Blount's weary croon spinning a narrative about waking up to the smell of a burning house, but wanting to fall back asleep anyway. Dark dreaminess colors every cut, a disorientation like the foggy mental state that comes between sleep and waking. Even "Married Woman" and "Norma," structured, accessible country, are foreboding, and sardonic-pop "I Sent You Up" details dismembering a lover. Bookended by atmospheric sprawls, both running over nine uneasy minutes, Plays One Sound embraces the lurking presence that looms in the pockets of its sound. (Album

The Soul & the Heal (Rootball)

Need a soundtrack to the coming apocalypse? Gurf Morlix has what you're looking for. The Soul & the Heal, his ninth



album, finds the veteran Austin guitarist and singer-songwriter in a typically dark mood, vet also offers the occasional glimmer of hope and love. As in the past, he takes cues from his good friend Ray Wylie Hubbard. Morlix offers blues-based music with rattling percussion and snaking guitar licks, but his lyrics are deeper, sometimes chilling, and at other times reaffirming. Not until the album's last three songs do things really come into focus, however. "Quicksilver Kiss," sounding as close to his onetime collaborator Lucinda Williams as he's ever done, positively gleams with optimism. He follows it up with a roughed-up ode to "My Chainsaw" and ends with "The Best We Can," an acoustic prayer to the humanity in all of us.

A clean-cut collection featuring the Korg KR-55 drum machine, MF064 catches Austin's analog



synth quartet Survive in the midst of evolution. Returning to print a 2014 EP, released well prior to half the band garnering Grammy nominations for two volumes of the Stranger Things soundtrack, homegrown arts hub Monofonus facilitates an ideal rising tide that lifts all boats. "Turing Test" is a dusty ambient trip, steely and mostly eschewing logical rhythm. On the flip, the sparkling "Parousia" starts by sucking the listener into a vacuum, before flipping to a jaunting Italo disco jam. Similarly, "Short Hour" also goes heavy with the arpeggios, though harder charging.

MAN, WOMAN, FRIEND. COMPUTER

Meditative and fetching, Man, Woman, Friend, Computer delivers a breakup



album and overarching concept: Thomas Echols' electronic differentiation from his guitar projects. The Austin-based Echols has mostly cut his teeth on classical projects, such as Plainte Calme, his absorbing turn of Debussy and Messiaen. Here, he ventures into a complex amalgam of analog and synth. Wistful, romantic, "Exordium" registers as an unhurried drive down a never-ending highway. Echols' vocals sooth to surrender on "Concession Speech" and "You're a Pistol." Standout "Nocturne" and its earlier interlude provide mid-tempo kinetics. ★★★★

DAMASE/ MANICAN DREAM True Color/Chaos Is (Manican Dream)


Combining projects into something of an experimental double



EP, the ambient-tech Damase (Jeff Bye) and flowing synthesis of Manican Dream (Bye and Nathaniel Earl) assembles a digestible and diverse local sampler. Manican's side A and lone track, "Chaos Is," builds and folds over itself, swimming in boiling clangs that give way to agitated string strums and mechanical warbling. Only a kick drum grounding buoyant ethereals, Damase's "True Color" blends ambience and techno into a subtle disorientation, nothing quite in lockstep. "Polarflex" clicks and ticks off time lost to the fade, wobbling never too far from the axis. ★★★

PARAMOUNT THEATRE, TUESDAY 28 Oh Pep! opens

Originally from Memphis, but now calling Brooklyn home, Valerie June stunned the musical firmament on 2013's Dan Auerbach-produced Pushin' Against a Stone. An amalgam of Southern styles she calls "organic moonshine roots music" - blues, gospel, soul, and trad folk sung in an old-timey voice - it announced the arrival of a major artist. The title of next month's highly anticipated follow-up, The Order of Time, does not refer to the years between records.

"There are so many people who've supported my journey," explains the singer, 35. "From booking me or giving me a kind word to the bunch of people who told me I was terrible when I first started. So it's not only my journey, it's our journey. The whole journey from when I was young is the reason why I called it The Order of Time. I don't even think about

the time between records, because I don't feel like I've ever had a day off.

"I toured from 2014 to 2016, doing 200 shows a year, and as soon as I got off the road I started making a record. That's different work than the road work, but it's still work. So here we are. It's 2017 and I'm putting it out and I'm on the road again, which is the funny thing."

The new album brings a new expansiveness to June's music. One song in particular stands apart. "Man Done Wrong" entrances with a hypnotic banjo riff betraying African origins rather than American bluegrass.

"I really wanted to set the banjo free on this record," claims June. "When I got that song I said to myself, 'This is so tribal.' It surprised me [laughs]. So I had to learn how to play it on the banjo. I can play to my songs, but that's about it."

MOHAWK WEEK

Sharing is caring. Red River mainstay Mohawk welcomes back Swedish song whisperer Jens Lekman (Fri. 24), whose fourth album Life Will See You Now serves 10 introspective vignettes over suave keys, buoyant percussion, and charming saxophones. Philadelphia indie-pop duo the **Dove & the Wolf** supports with lush soundscapes and ethereal vocal harmonies from native Parisians Paloma Gil and Lou Havat, Native boot-scooters Reckless Kelly, Mike & the Moonpies, and Harvest Thieves (Sat. 25) bolster outlaw anthems with crunchy riffs, honky-tonk piano, and roaring fiddles. Next, two prog-pop quintets square off: Brooklyn's Landlady (Sun. 26) augments spacey, mid-tempo crunge with sultry vocals on January's The World is a Loud Place, while Austin openers Slomo Drags counter with mischievous falsettos and cacophonous fuzz guitar freak-outs. Los Angeles alt-rock troubadours Wilderado (Mon. 27) flex brash, reverb-drenched guitars and whiskey-soaked harmonies alongside local "Americana gothic" tunesmith Garner Sloan. Kindatheart (Wed. 1) rev frenetic pop-rock inside, as outside fellow locals Holy Wave, Ringo Deathstarr, and Pale Dian blast post-punk with wistful vox and jangle-pop straight out of Haight-Ashbury. San Francisco's **Deafheaven** (Thu. 2) swaddles militant black metal riffs in radiant bursts of shoegaze guitar, San Marcos post-rock quartet This Will Destroy You blends seemingly endless guitar swells with textural strings, and L.A. songstress **Emma Ruth Rundle** juxtaposes haunting, ambient folk-rock with sinister post-grunge in support. - Brvan Rolli

TIFT MERRITT, SERA CAHOÓNE 3ten ACL Live, Friday 24

Texans and Texas obviously agree about North Carolina's Tift Merritt. Don Henley recorded her "Bramble Rose" on his latest solo album, while former Hill Country bard Sam Beam produced Merritt's new Stitch of the World, partly written in Marfa. The Houston-born singer, 42, has delighted fans since her 2002 Lost Highway Records debut and her sixth LP continues the trend, blending trad Americana, passionate storytelling. Jim Caligiuri and a crystal clear voice.

CARNAVAL **BRASILEIRO** Palmer Events Center, Saturday 25

As Austin's best bacchanal turns 40, consider the global convergence of Carnaval. Final blowout before Lent, the repentance period before the start of the Christian liturgical year, its unhinged rave stills boasts New Orleans' Mardi Gras as its exemplar, yet Catholic countries worldwide party down as March nears. A Bahia exotic now based in San Francisco, Dandara Odara equals a "Brazilian Tina Turner," with Austin Samba School warming the throng with eyes-white roil beforehand. - Raoul Hernandez

AUSTIN INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC FEST **Empire Control Room,** Saturday 25

For a third year, AIMFest proves there's more to Austin than singer/songwriters. L.A. headliner El Ten Eleven's synth rock avoids EDM madness, while local percussion guru Rattletree prompts an Afro-Latin dance party. ATXers Legendary Skies sweep in widescreen post-rock, and homegrown Verisimilitude favors crystalline prog-rock. Cap City luminaries form jazz collectives [Q] and Fermata Playa. Vinyl Boss, Dolphin Dilemma, Seven Circles, and nearly a dozen more round out an exceptionally diverse lineup. - Michael Toland

AUSTIN JUKEBOX 6: E, DYR FASER, **MANIKIN**

Beerland, Saturday 25

Deftly curated eclecticism remains the sole constant in this series of shows presented by Super Secret Records' Richard Lynn. Boston's E boasts Come/ Live Skull principal Thalia Zedek delivering avant-punk shrapnel alongside Neptune instrument builder Mark Sanford and Karate drummer Gavin McCarthy. Zedek also performs in Dyr Faser, the synth/ psych brainchild of Eric Boomhower, Local noir punks Manikin rarely perform now, but 2009's Stop the Sirens remains hot to the touch. Noise butcher Breakdancing Ronald Reagan sluices fabric early. - Greg Beets

NOMEANSNO HOOT Lost Well, Saturday 25

Punk's ultimate outlier, an intellectually fierce Canadian trio spiking the genre with jazz, prog, and art-rock, last terrorized Austin with a triumphant tent set at Fun Fun Fun Fest 2012. The other Wright brothers delivered their magnum opus a decade into the group's career on essential 1989 LP Wrong, and announced their retirement in

September. Saturday's covers marathon features locals who play outside of 4/4 time, including Jazzus Lizard, Invincible Czars, OMGWTFBBO, and is now your best chance. to experience NoMeansNo songs live.

Stockholm Syndrome recently caused JBOT to unite with his human-hating mechanical masters for new metal album Endless Circle of Bullshit. - Kevin Curtin
