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

Thanks for the story. I miss you all.



EADLINES

CITY COUNCIL RETURNS today for its final meeting before the summer break, with 130 Items, including action on the \$816 million November bond (potentially still growing), the potential for soccer at McKalla Place, and economic incentives. See "Council's Last Licks," p.10.

AUSTIN PUBLIC HEALTH reported this week on the sad state of the Austin Resource Center for the Homeless. Director Stephanie Hayden noted Austin Code's six major issues facing the facility, including bedbugs, inconsistent water temperatures, and fire door and occupancy limit violations. The department is working with Front Steps to resolve the issues.

SICK PAY STAYS ... for now. After two days of hearings, Travis County Judge Tim Sulak ruled against the Texas Public Policy Foundation and business groups in their attempt to block Austin's paid sick leave ordinance. Sulak declined to grant a temporary injunction against the ordinance, scheduled to take effect in October. Council's Ione conservative **Ellen Troxclair** testified against the ordinance.

AUSTIN FIRE CADET DEVON CONEY passed away suddenly on Tuesday night after suffering an unknown medical emergency.

SCOTUS DON'T HURT US It was a week of awful rulings at the **U.S. Supreme Court**, which ruled this week to uphold President Trump's Muslim travel ban, found in favor of California anti-abortion crisis pregnancy centers, decided public sector unions cannot require dues from nonmembers - aka "free riders" - who benefit from union-negotiated contracts but choose not to pay, and sided with the GOP on a number of gerrymandering cases. See "Point Austin," at right, and "Naked City." p.9. for more.

AND RODNEY REED lost out at SCOTUS, too. The high court ruled against the death row inmate's request for additional **DNA testing** on untested items of evidence concerning the 1996 murder of Stacey Stites. Reed's attorneys filed a new pleading with the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals that argues Reed's conviction was based on scientific testimony that's now proven to be wrong.

TO TOP IT OFF Justice **Anthony Kennedy** on Wednesday announced his retirement at the end of July. Kennedy, now 81, was considered a swing vote on the bench, though this week's votes drove home the fact that he's actually quite conservative. His departure opens the door for Trump to nominate a second justice.

THE TEXAS DEMOCRATS crafted a party platform last weekend at their convention that includes **legalizing marijuana**, limiting access to assault-style weapons, supporting paid sick leave rules, and providing tuition-free community college to Texas residents. Shangri-la, here we come!



The Wages of Civility

THE SUPREME COURT CONFIRMS THAT ELECTIONS HAVE CONSEQUENCES

No doubt if Democrats had only been nicer to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell - more "civil" - he would have allowed, in deference to longtime Senate

norms, a hearing and a vote on President Barack Obama's appointee to the Supreme Court, Merrick Garland. If civility had been duly honored, the court fortified instead by GOP functionary Neil Gorsuch would not this week be handing down one reactionary decision after another: on redistricting, on discrimination against Muslims, on public sector unions.

the national media is in an unholy dither over the news that some administration officials are being treated rudely in public by people upset with official extremism. Most notably, people are resisting the "zerotolerance" anti-immigration policy that first kidnapped children away from their parents, then substituted indefinite family incarceration for indefinite child incarcera-

> tion. That revised policy remains in force, although contested - a federal judge ruled this week that under the Constitution neither parents nor children can be detained indefinitely. Nevertheless, pundits are getting the vapors because a handful of Trump operatives might get yelled at when they go out to eat.

> That seems to me a weirdly lopsided set of reporting

priorities, but then I live in Texas, where we're so used to being ruled by petty tyrants that we're wondering whether those folks on the East Coast can recognize a national crisis when it bites them on the ass. As it happens, the first of those reactionary court

decisions had its Texas connection, as a 5-4 majority decided (in a tortured opinion by Justice Samuel Alito) that unless the state's GOP redistricters had been caught on tape enthusiastically singing the chorus of Randy Newman's "Rednecks," their packing-and-cracking of minority voters could not be construed as illegal "racism."

The result, as dissenting Justice Sonia Sotomayor summarized, is that "minority voters in Texas - despite constituting a majority of the population within the State - will ... return to the polls in 2018 and 2020 with the knowledge that their ability to exercise meaningfully their right to vote has been burdened by the manipulation of district lines specifically designed to target their communities and minimize their political will."



against the 5-4 decision by the court to uphold Trump's determination to ban Muslims from entering the U.S. By a series of contortions (delivered this time by Chief Justice John Roberts), the majority concluded that whatever candidate and President Trump had repeatedly said - that he fully intended to ban all Muslims from entering the U.S., because "they hate us" - his eventual "Travel Ban" was sufficiently country-selective to pass iudicial muster.

Sotomayor reiterated the numerous Trump declarations declaiming that his actions were explicitly aimed at Muslims, noted how they recalled the outrageous internment of Japanese-Americans during World War II, called the decision "gravely wrong," and concluded: "Our Constitution demands, and our country deserves, a Judiciary willing to hold the coordinate branches to account when they defy our most sacred legal commitments. ... [W]ith profound regret, I dissent."

Although the decisions nominally address different subjects, it's worth noting the interpretive links between the redistricting decision and the Muslim ban. Alito wrote that if you can't find a racist smoking gun, you can't prove racism. Roberts wrote that even in the presence of dozens of racist smoking guns ... when the president shoots, the court will look the other way.

From Worse to Worst

If all this were not enough, on Wednesday the court ruled that free riders on public employee unions can continue to benefit from union-negotiated contracts without contributing to union expenses, because money = speech. (Remember Citizens United?)

As it happens, the decision has less direct effect in Texas - one of more than two dozen "right-to-work-for-less" states where public unions are already prohibited from collecting non-member fees. Texas will go right on treating all public employees like ... well, hired hands, to be underpaid, abused, or dismissed, "at-will," The "freedom" enjoyed by Texas working people - more precisely, by their bosses - can now travel the entire country.

Within a few hours, that decision was itself overshadowed by the announcement of Justice Anthony Kennedy (who joined in these reactionary decisions) that he will retire next month - handing over the appointment of his successor to possibly the most ignorant and morally vile person ever to sit in the Oval Office. Within minutes, Sen. McConnell was announcing that the Senate would "vote to confirm Justice Kennedy's successor this fall." (He didn't add that they should wait until the voters have spoken - maybe he just forgot to mention it.)

Perhaps if Democrats behave with great civility for the next few months, Trump and McConnell will pick a justice who will respect the actual Constitution and the law. rather than just defer to national Republican priorities. Somehow I doubt it.

And, We're Off ...

COUNCIL TEES UP CODENEXT FOR A LOOOONG DRIVE, TAKES A BREATHER

City Council held their first meeting on the **CodeNEXT** land development code rewrite in two weeks (see "CodeNEXT and Compatibility," p.10), and if they didn't find any answers regarding how to move forward, they at least defined some questions – and sent city staff off to do at least part of the testing and scenario-building that was promised as part of the drafting process, while they take the next month off.

Council spent the entire day Wednesday talking about compatibility standards and transition zones – that is, how close can an eight- or 10-story building be built next to single-family homes? More specifically, if we want to allow those large buildings along major streets (Council generally does), then how deep into neighborhoods should that upzoning go - or conversely, what sorts of

protections do existing homes have? Does an existing singlefamily neighborhood that extends right up to a major corridor trump the desire for greater density along that corridor? Or do we start with the density, and upzone properties away from the corridor to create a "step-down" into the single-family area? (And if so, how gradual or deep should that step-down be?) By the

end of this day, Council hadn't answered those questions, but there did seem to be a consensus that yes, we want to zone for residential density along corridors, and yes, singlefamily homes should get some sort of buffer zone. And that seemed to be as far as they wanted to get for now. Slow progress indeed.

And while compatibility is one of the thornier issues that has to be worked out – and it won't have a simple answer for all parts of town it's also only one among a number of such issues that Council will have to work through. Parking requirements, affordability incentives, neighborhood plans, "legacy" zones: Those are all looming down the road, and none of them will be any easier than compatibility.

Ora Houston insisted that the transition zone mapping is "going to have to be context-sensitive," to account for conditions on the ground – she cited a number of streets and roads in her East Austin district that have drastically different characteristics. She also suggested that, since her district's Chestnut neighborhood had adopted into

its neighborhood plan every one of the tools

available in the city's toolbox duplexes, ADUs, mixed-use, etc. - that the city look at the results there to how those have been used, and what differences they've made.

Perhaps that will be part of the testing process Council is asking for; perhaps it won't. Item 125 on today's Council agenda is a resolution (sponsored by CMs Ellen

Troxclair, Ann Kitchen,

Jimmy Flannigan, and Mayor Steve Adler) "directing the City Manager to convene a group of design and development professionals and technical experts to obtain review, modeling, and testing of regulations proposed in CodeNEXT" - essentially, if I understand it correctly, to rerun the charrette

process that the Austin chapter of the American Institute of Architects ran on the first and second drafts of the code - and return to Council with the results by the end of August. Adler noted that, "Whatever testing processes have gone on have not been very transparent ... to the community."

But Assistant City Manager Joe Pantaleon sounded markedly skeptical that his staff would be able to run that all down, in a transparent yet comprehensive manner, in the requested time frame. Planning Dept. Director **Greg Guernsey** noted that even deciding what constitutes an appropriate "design and development professional" might be hard to pin down, as he referenced the ongoing controversy over the makeup of the Planning Commission. Nonetheless, Council will likely pass some version of that resolution today, with the hope that they can get the results just as they're finishing up with budget considerations in the first week of September.

That's not going to happen, of course, at least not in a way that will provide the answers in the manner Council wants to see. So it's another in the long line of unrealistic and artificial deadlines that have hampered progress for the past year and a half. But it's a step, nonetheless, in catching up on the prep work that should have been completed at earlier stages in the process, so that's good. And overall, CMs are asking good questions, and not yelling at each other, so, that's good, too. Just don't expect any actual product, or relief from the endless loop, any-

NAKED CITY

JIMOBOUS FLANIGOUS TAKES CEDAR PARK

It will surprise absolutely nobody that supporters of former District 6 City Council Member Don Zimmerman are still extremely bitter about the results of the 2016 election, when businessman and former Austin Gay and Lesbian Chamber of Commerce president **Jimmy Flannigan** defeated the conservative firebrand in his bid for another term. Zim's former campaign manager Tim Kelly put on display those hurt feelings in a Facebook post last week, in which he railed against Flannigan's participation in Cedar Park politics, particularly his support for Council candidates Patrick Walz and Michael Thompson, both of whom lost in May. Kelly aired his grievances with an Aurelian bent: "While Rome (Austin) burns, D6 General Jimobous Flanigous had so much time on his hands that he felt it imperative to further expand the Empire of Austin into my city." In a follow-up exchange, Kelly told me that because Flannigan supported the two "extremist" candidates, he would be returning the favor next time Flannigan is facing voters. "I may even use Maxine Waters' recommendations," he wrote, alluding to the California congresswoman's call to "push back" on the Trump administration. "No holds are barred." Flannigan declined to respond to Kelly's post, and we don't blame him. - Nina Hernandez

NO DANCE CLUB NEAR DAFFODIL APTS

Good news for the **Daffodil Apartments** on E. Ben White: City staff has reportedly found a process that will keep an adult cabaret from opening across the street. Foundation Communities Executive Director Walter Moreau sounded the alarm about the planned cabaret last month, because the Daffodil complex has an afterschool program, which Moreau felt should bar such a business (in this case, Global Auto) from moving in, per the section of city code barring adult-oriented businesses within 1,000 feet of licensed day care centers. But staffers had told Moreau that because the kids' program wasn't licensed before the permitting process got started, the cabaret would be able to move forward. That's where we left off on May 18 ("Swing Sets and Champagne Rooms?"), but following pressure from Moreau and Daffodil residents, as well as Council Member Delia Garza, who represents the area, staff has reportedly found a process that will keep everybody happy (except, perhaps, your aspiring after-hours gentleman). Moreau said this week that he believes the applicant will abort the plan to move in across the street, and a spokesperson from the Planning & Zoning Department said that staff added a comment to the application, which Global Auto can clear by proposing an alternate use. N.H.



SCOTUS LETS GERRYMANDERING SLIDE

In a 5-4 decision, the U.S. Supreme Court on Monday tossed out a lower court ruling that Texas lawmakers drew state House and congressional maps to suppress black and Latino voters, citing the evidence as "plainly insufficient." Justices upheld 10 of the 11 challenged districts (including Austin Rep. Lloyd Doggett's Congressional District 35), leaving only Fort Worth's House District 90, currently occupied by Ramon Romero, to be deemed racially gerrymandered.

Justice Sonia Sotomayor wrote the minority's dissent, calling the maps specifically designed to minimize the political will of minority voters: "This disregard of both precedent and fact comes at serious costs to our democracy. It means that, after years of litigation and undeniable proof of intentional discrimination, minority voters in Texas - despite constituting a majority of the population within the State - will continue to be underrepresented in the political process." State Rep. **Eddie Rodriguez**, D-Austin, a named co-plaintiff in the case, chided the conservative-leaning high court "chose to ignore the voter suppression suffered by millions of Texans over the past seven years." - Mary Tuma

SAY GOODBYE TO THE PLASTIC BAG BAN

The **Texas Supreme Court** struck down the city of Laredo's ban on plastic bags last Friday, in a decision that will likely affect Austin's own (popular and effective) ordinance, after five-plus years in operation. Justices ruled unanimously that a state law (1993's Solid Waste Disposal Act) prohibiting municipalities from restricting the use of plastic bags overrode local ordinances that forbid the retail provision of single-use bags at the point of sale, following a lawsuit filed by the Laredo Merchants Association against that city. While Friday's ruling doesn't cite Austin specifically, its order is broad enough to implicate Austin's law (and those of other cities throughout Texas) as being guite endangered moving forward.

Further evidence of the local ordinance's shaky footing emerged quickly, when Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton emerged from his polluted cave to "commend" the court "for upholding the principle that no one is exempted from the rule of law." He continued: "This ruling sends the unambiguous message to all local jurisdictions in Texas that they do not get to simply ignore laws they don't agree with. I hope that Laredo, Austin, and any other jurisdictions that have enacted illegal bag bans will take note and voluntarily bring their ordinances into compliance with state law. Should they decline to do so, I expect the ruling will be used to invalidate any other illegal bag bans statewide."

Wonderful. The Texas Hammer strikes again. Following the ruling, Environment Texas

Executive Director Luke Metzger noted that while the ruling may set precedent to do away with Austin's ordinance, "major retailers, like H-E-B and Walmart" can "continue observing the ban," and ask the Lege to remove the pre-emption statute - or at the very least encourage shoppers to continue toting their totes.

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Council's Last Licks

CLOSING UP SHOP BEFORE SUMMER BREAK

Freshly back from their trip to Tornillo, where members (save for Ellen Troxclair and Ora Houston, who didn't go) joined advocates and elected officials from across the country to rally around the migrant children who'd been separated from their parents, City Council sat down for a work session on Tuesday with another hefty agenda. Today, Thu., June 28, is the body's last meeting before their summer break, and it comes at the end of a busy week, including an all-day special called meeting Wednesday on CodeNEXT (see below). That means 130 Items on the agenda, including action on parking and traffic at Zilker Park ("Stratford Drive," p.15) and some sort of fate for McKalla Place ("The Knockout Stage," p.12.)

Enjoy! It'll be the last fix for a full month.

Bond Talk

One of the more substantial items on Council's agenda is action on City Manager Spencer Cronk's suggested bond package to put before voters in November. Cronk's \$816 million ask comprises:

- •\$161 million for affordable housing,
- •\$176 million in transportation infrastructure,
- •\$167 on parks and recreation,
- •\$184 for stormwater and open space,
- •\$74 million for libraries and cultural centers.
- •\$38 million in public safety, and

•\$16 million for health and human services. As usual, the proposal is the result of

countless hours of work by the Bond Election Advisory Task Force, and is at once a heavy lift and nowhere near enough to fulfill needs in any of the included sectors.

Questions on Economic Incentives

Members spent part of Tuesday's work session poring over long-awaited changes to how the city operates its economic incentives under Texas Local Government Code Chapter 380. Council asked for the changes to the program's stated values, including an emphasis on diversity, but lingering questions from a number of CMs about transparency and other details made it possible the package could be pushed into August. That might make it tricky to fund the business expansion program included in the recommendation, since that will be butting up against budget season. Cronk suggested that in the time between the work session and Thursday's meeting his office could work to answer any outstanding questions so that the items could move forward. Multiple members are eager to get the ball rolling, so there's a chance it does make the final cut.

Solicitation Ordinance in Limbo

After the business community came out against changes to the city's anti-solicitation ordinance that prohibits aggressive panhandling, city staff tapped the brakes on the issue to gather public input. A report by the Office of the City Auditor concluded last year that the solicitation rule, in combination with two other provisions on the books, helps effectively criminalize homelessness and doesn't help connect people to resources as advertised. Council was due to discuss the item on Thursday, but that got delayed again, and staff will return it to the agenda when they've garnered sufficient public feedback.

Also included is a pair of items that will scrap some of the more burdensome regulations on the city's taxi and chauffeur companies. It's an effort to bring into the 21st century an industry that was so infamously difficult to regulators and consumers alike that it encouraged the arrival of ridesharing. The



proposed changes will relax city regulations concerning rates, fleet numbers, third-party inspection and trade dress requirements, and virtual meters. The Transportation Department assures Council it has done the required stakeholder engagement, though you can never be too sure with cabbies.

So Long for Summer

Following that, Council's officially out for summer – er, July at least. Members will pry themselves from their hammocks the first week of August and return to many of the same issues: CodeNEXT will still be here; budget talks will start to ramp up; and with slowing economic growth and a homestead exemption-sized hole in available funds, there are sure to be many headache-inducing conversations ahead.

Speaking of which, Police Monitor Farah Muscadin reported on Tuesday that she and a working group will spend the next several months crafting a recommendation for a new police oversight system. Council's desire for the city to achieve more oversight components without giving away the budget in return will chafe with the Austin Police Association, which has spent 20 years negotiating those oversight concessions in exchange for generous compensation packages.

And that's not to mention that three council members (plus Mayor Steve Adler) will begin campaigning in earnest for their re-elections until November. Ora Houston decided against running again, but Ellen Troxclair, Ann Kitchen, and Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo are all defending their seats.

With such a lengthy to-do list, it'll be a miracle if we can get everybody to show up again on Aug. 9. - Nina Hernandez

CODENEXT AND COMPATIBILITY

Mayor Steve Adler opened up City Council's special called meeting on CodeNEXT Wednesday with a short tribute to John Fregonese, the city planner who succumbed to cancer last week. Fregonese was a major consultant on Austin's land use rewrite, and Adler said he will be sorely missed. But the pleasantries didn't last long, and the dais waded into two controversial topics: compatibility standards and transition areas.

In theory, the two tools help ensure a symbiotic relationship between residential-scaled building and high-density development. Consultants argue our current compatibility standards are "uncommonly suppressive" and limit development along corridors and city centers, which limits the number of housing units that can be built. But naysayers worry that loosened compatibility standards will trigger a "domino effect" from increased density along corridors into neighborhoods, said Leslie Pool, who noted that people are "afraid" this will happen "really

quickly." The dais spent the better part of Wednesday debating the impact of the tools and directed staff and consultants to return in

August with additional information. In pulling "placeholder" Item 125 from this week's Council agenda for discussion, Adler emphasized the importance of publicly and transparently testing CodeNEXT as it's proposed in draft 3.5, as well as the land use commissions' recommendations. (Staff previously proposed six months of testing after adoption, prior to implementation.) The dais will vote on a formal resolution on testing directives today, June

28. The conversation on next steps was ongoing as we went to press. Look for an update online today, at austinchronicle.com/daily/news.

BACK AT THE LAND USE COMMISSIONS

Adler has proposed appointing Yvette Flores to the Planning Commission in place of Stephen Oliver, the former chair who stepped down earlier this month. This won't be Flores' first rodeo with the land use commissions; until recently she served on the **Zoning and Platting Commis**sion, also as the mayor's appointee, where she was one of the four commissioners to vote against ZAP's "terminate CodeNEXT" Council recommendation. Flores has worked for the **Texas Department of Transportation** since 2014. During Council's Tuesday work session, Adler said that unlike Oliver, an architect, Flores has no professional ties to development or real estate (a hot issue with the Planning Commission these days, in case you haven't heard). If all goes as planned, Council will appoint Flores during today's meeting.

LEGAL CONFLICTS

The court hearing to decide if the **petition to put** CodeNEXT to public vote is in fact legal was rescheduled. Travis County Judge Orlinda Naranjo will hear arguments this coming Monday, July 2. - Sarah Marloff


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The Knockout Stage

SHOWTIME AT MCKALLA PLACE

Anthony Precourt finds out today (Thursday) if he cleared the first political hurdle in moving his Columbus Crew MLS team to Austin, as Council will vote on two resolutions: Item 60, brought forth by Leslie Pool, which would allow developers to submit their own plans for McKalla Place; and Kathie Tovo's Item 130, directing City Manager Spencer Cronk to pursue negotiations with Precourt Sports Ventures on a potential stadium deal. (Council will also consider Item 117, to approve \$200,000 in funding to retain Greenberg Traurig LLP, in the event that negotiations with PSV continue.) Item 130 was updated on Monday to include a key phrase directing Cronk to "solicit plans for the development of affordable housing on another City-owned tract."

The addition at this stage is sure to be attractive to the three council members who are not sponsoring either item (Greg Casar, Ann Kitchen, and Jimmy Flannigan). It also serves to minimize the argument made by Pool and Alison Alter that a stadium deal at McKalla could detract from the city's mission to build affordable housing on publicly owned land.

The week leading up to Council's vote has seen a flurry of activity: mailers urging residents to turn up for the Thursday meeting; online campaigns directing calls and emails to sponsors of both resolutions (and, critically, the three CMs in the middle); NextDoor threads with 100-plus replies, pitting neighbor against neighbor; and Statesman editorials have all contributed to the deluge of information being thrown at city residents. On Tuesday, PSV released an updated conceptual rendering of a "stadium and soccer park," including on-site affordable housing (130 units) and an additional four-level parking structure that could hold up to 600 cars, up from 300. Presumably, the parking spaces would also be used by the people living in the housing units, so it's unclear how much the additional spots would alleviate community concerns about game day parking.

But the possibility of on-site affordable housing directly addresses complaints from neighborhood groups opposed to the deal. For weeks, the Gracywoods Neighborhood Association and others have asked why the city should "give away" land deemed suitable for affordable housing. Although the number of proposed housing units on-site is much lower than the 500 sketched out by another developer, it undermines the argument that the stadium deal would take away land that could be used for affordable housing. Representatives for PSV stressed that the plan is conceptual, and as of now, the amount of funding PSV has committed to Foundation Communities (\$500,000 upfront, with \$125,000 per year up to a total of \$4.8 million) would not change. PSV's Austinbased attorney Richard Suttle said the concept was "an interesting idea that warrants discussion" and that "PSV remains open to negotiating elements that result in the successful realization of a Major League Soccer stadium" at McKalla. In an emailed statement, Pool said of the new plan: "Affordable housing is a key goal, along with limiting stadium subsidies and supporting public transit. I'm looking forward to seeing every-



one put their best foot forward on this issue so we can have all our options on the table."

Pool's office shared property tax estimates that detail what surrounding taxing entities could stand to lose out on should the city maintain ownership of the stadium and McKalla lot. These assume the value of the

land to be \$29.5 million - based on a 2016 third-party appraisal commissioned by the city - with an additional "improvement value" of \$200 million based on PSV's estimated construction cost for the stadium. With an estimated value of \$229.5 million and a "moderately conservative" tax rate

Southgate-Lewis Survives Code Probe

The historic Southgate-Lewis House on the corner of 12th Street and Comal is one of the city's few remaining remnants of old East Austin. You can sense 130 years of history as you approach the structure's exterior, which is adorned with portraits of influential East Austinites. Sculptures by retired artist Bertram Allen, who serves as the home's caretaker, dot the lawn where members of the W.H. Passon Historical Society host their gatherings. The society has owned the property since 1986, when they bought it from the family of the entrepreneur **Charles Lewis**, but has lately found itself on the wrong side of Austin Code Enforcement, after a complainant accused the society of running a museum without proper permitting.

Allen said he was first contacted by Code last August, and was told that the city received a complaint about an unstable deck and a couple of damaged side panels. Allen believed he'd fixed everything when Code came back and asked to see inside. That brought more issues, including the lack of fire alarms, which Allen installed (along with CO₂ detectors). But the problems weren't over: Code returned and levied the charge that the society was operating a museum.

The W.H. Passon Historical Society is a group of elderly African-Americans who often congregate at Southgate-Lewis. And while nobody actually lives there, Allen was adamant that the property does not house a museum: "In the past, we did



have some tours. [But] most of them were through the city." He blames the mix-up on a former member (since passed) who tried to open up an unrelated religious museum using the house's address. That effort is long defunct, Allen said, though mentions of it can still be found on various old websites.

Code Enforcement doesn't usually just show up to your place by accident; the department is complaint driven, which means somebody had to put the house on the city's radar. If

it were found to be running a commercial enterprise like a museum without a certificate of occupancy, Code would first try to get the business into compliance, but could eventually issue a citation, affidavit, or even refer the case to Municipal Court. For a community of elders, the process would be unmanageable. Natasha Harper-Madison, a District 1 City Council candidate who's president of the East 12th Street Merchant's Association and founder of East Austin Advocates, has been working to help Allen and the society navigate the already complicated situation. She doesn't believe Code's attention and the house's placement on a highly sought-after piece of real estate are mere coincidence.

"Somebody's doing something," she said. "And I look forward to having the opportunity to get to the bottom of it. These are elderly people who have a limited amount of time and knowledge about what to do about this. This is new to them. This never happened before; nobody gave enough of a shit about what was happening at the corner of 12th and Comal before to give them a hard time. I want them to stop having a hard time."

Apparently that worked out. Last week, Code confirmed it had found insufficient evidence of a museum on the site and closed the case on June 19. That was news to Allen when I spoke to him on Tuesday, demonstrating the communication gap between the society and city staff. Nevertheless, he expressed relief that the situation appears to be at last resolved. - Nina Hernandez increase of 6%, the calculations show the main taxing entities in the area (City of Austin, Travis County, Austin Independent School District, Central Health, and Austin Community College) could lose out on about \$6.4 million in tax revenues over the first five years of the deal. After 20 years - the initial term of the lease proposed by PSV the taxing entities could have lost out on about \$186 million. Those aren't official numbers, but according to the Travis County Tax Office, the formulas used by Pool's office are a reasonable way to estimate property tax revenue from a piece of land with "property improvement" built on it.

Resistance to the stadium has grown more organized in recent weeks. A group calling itself "No Soccer Subsidy" put together a rally to call on Council to open a request for proposal process on the lot before accepting PSV's offer. About 40 people gathered in the Jimmy John's parking lot at the corner of Braker and Burnet (just behind McKalla Place) last Saturday to voice concerns about the deal. A hodgepodge of public figures were on hand to speak, representing a strange brew of interests opposed to the potential land deal.

AISD Trustee Ann Teich took aim at the potential loss in property tax revenues, saying that the local school district, already suffering from a state school finance system that siphons funding through recapture payments, was in no position to turn away potential tax dollars. "There's so much money that goes back to the state," she said. "We need every dollar we can get."

However, 40 people constitutes only a small gathering, and as the rally got underway at 10am, bars across the city were filled with soccer fans for the World Cup. Austin has boasted some of the highest TV ratings in America for WC broadcasts, bolstering the notion that the city is primed for an MLS team.

Precourt's Austin-based consultant Mark Littlefield was energized by those figures, and remained optimistic about the Thursday vote. But he acknowledged that even if Item 130 passes, the real work to bring MLS to Austin would just be getting underway. "No matter how much the city loves soccer," he said, "there is still a lot of due diligence left to do to make sure the city is protected and getting the best deal possible." – Austin Sanders





Williamson County **Commissioners End Hutto Contract**

Williamson County Commissioners voted 4-1 on Monday to end the county's contract with ICE through CoreCivic to run the **T. Don Hutto detention center** in Taylor. Under the approved terms, the contract, established in 2010, will now expire by Jan. 31, 2019.

"Being the go-between for a federal agency and private business on a federal issue such as this is not a core county function," said Commissioner Terry Cook, who voted in favor of ending the contract. Cook noted the vote doesn't solve the larger issue of closing the facility, or secure the fate of the roughly 500 largely asylum-seeking women detained there. She asked for activists to refrain from celebrating, and instead requested they "redouble" their efforts to change immigration policy at the federal level.

Following the vote, speakers thanked commissioners for their courage and read troubling letters from women detained at Hutto. The detention center is riddled with accusations of abuse, including sexual misconduct and medical neglect, as previously reported by the Chronicle ("Allegations Mount at T. Don Hutto." Dec. 1, 2017). On Monday, the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund sent a letter to the **Department of Homeland Security** asking the agency to reopen two sexual abuse investigations at the facility. Activists say at least 35 mothers who were torn from their children as a result of Trump's (now paused) separation policy are being held at the facility.



Prior to the vote. Grassroots Leadership - at the forefront of efforts to encourage the county to end the contract - led a "Jericho" protest and march, borrowing biblical inspiration to "tear down the walls" of the detention center. The nonprofit's Sofia Casini reminded commissioners that they could end the contract even sooner, within 90 days as opposed to the six months they approved, and that doing so would shift "moral and legal liability" from the court. The extra time gives the feds a wide cushion to find another government funding avenue. "This detention center is not needed in any form. It does not need to exist," said Casini. "They have friends and family that want them and can take them in. ... Please shut it down."

AISD Task Force: On the Money

A task force charged with finding creative solutions to stabilize the Austin Independent School District's ballooning budget met for the first time on Monday night. The district's 2018 budget (which passed June 18) is expected to extract \$29 million from the district's reserve funds. With \$20 million of that

fund already allocated for other needs, district officials expect the savings account to dip to \$210 million after 2018. AISD CFO Nicole Conley Johnson said the deficit is expected to double by the 2019-20 school year, at which point it would no longer be feasible to continue drawing from the reserve funds.

District officials point to the state's recapture financing system, Austin's rising property values, and decreases in student enrollment as the primary culprits for the continued budget deficits. To shore up reserves, the 31-person task force, composed of parents, students, AISD staff, campus administrators and faculty, and other community members, will explore a variety of solutions to the budget shortfall through the summer. Come fall, they'll present their ideas to Superintendent Paul Cruz, who will then refer some of them to the board of trustees for a vote. The task force will target the 2020 school year for any implementation, but Conley Johnson said some proposals could be implemented as soon as the 2018 school year, should the board push to make that happen. She said the task force would consider a "combination of solutions" including alternative revenue sources, such as selling or leasing land owned by the district, improving the "effectiveness and efficiency" of district programs, and partnering with local service providers to "extend and expand" current programs.

Conley Johnson acknowledged that under the state's current school finance system. the district has a tough road ahead, even if the task force comes back with several costsaving measures. "It's going to be difficult to overcome the lag and inaction at the state level," she said. "A lot of revenue is siphoned out of the community, and we're going to have to find really creative ways to bring more revenue into the district."

The task force has three more meetings on the calendar, but more could be added should the need arise. All are open to the public, and the next is set for July 16. - Austin Sanders

Piss or Spit: Drug Testing at ATCEMS

Collective bargaining between the city and Austin-Travis County EMS Association has begun anew, and with the city awaiting the results of a pay study ordered after the last negotiations fell through (when the two sides finished about \$8 million apart), the two sides have in the interim agreed to bargain over articles of the contract that won't be swayed by monetary concessions. That limits the agenda by quite a bit, but over four meetings in June, the city and association have found time to establish a few preliminary priorities concerning training, credentialing, scheduling, sick time accrual rates, and eligibility for promotions.

Also included has been a disagreement over the best method for drug testing medics after auto collisions. The department adheres to a broad set of criteria to determine when a medic must submit to a drug test ("What Drug Test?" May 11), and for years the city has required involved medics visit one of two facilities in the city (one central, one south) to submit a urine sample. But since 2013, medics have done that and taken an oral swab, the latter coming at the behest of the union, which agreed to two forms of testing during the last round of contract negotiations and has gone into this round hoping that the city will agree to use only that method (with a follow-up blood test, should they test positive with the swab).

Medics have a number of reasons for wanting to test only with oral swabs, beginning with the fact that it's the better of the two methods in determining whether someone is under the influence at the time that they submit to testing. (Urine samples test metabolites, creating a small time frame in which someone could be under the influence but not have it show up in testing.) But medics have also advocated for the efficiency: Swabs can be

> administered on-site rather than at a testing facility, meaning that any involved ambulance won't need to make the trip to the testing facility and will therefore be out of service for a shorter peri-

> > been adopted as a conventional testing method stateside, but point to growing popularity in Europe, and one government agency in Connecticut.

od of time. They concede that swabs haven't

Labor Relations Officer Deven Desai hasn't pit the city in complete opposition, but during a bargaining session on June 7 expressed a lack of comfort with the fact that the closest agency medics could find was in New England. He said the city's hesitant about being too far on the leading edge of drug testing.

The aforementioned pay study is expected to return in the next few weeks, at which point the two sides will have a lot more to talk about. The city and

ATCEMSA plan to meet again on July 2. They'll take a week to run working groups on particular issues after that, then reconvene to iron out outstanding terms and hopefully come to an agreement. ATCEMSA President Tony Marquardt has voiced a desire to get a tentative agreement to his membership by August, putting both parties in line to settle their impasse by September or the early fall.

STRATFORD DRIVE: LET'S WORK ON IT

The Stratford Drive Redevelopment **Project** is now on hold indefinitely. Last Friday, via city memo, Parks and Recreation Department Acting Director Kimberly McNeeley told City Council that she plans to put a halt to the project, following "constructive feedback" from the Environmental Commission and community members.

McNeeley had been hoping to achieve a relatively quick fix for a series of problems percolating around **Zilker Park**, namely that: a) the clay cap over the Butler Landfill (underneath the beaten patch of grass northwest of the Great Lawn) has been deteriorating such that it now requires a legitimate fix; and b) overflow parking at the Polo Fields (across Barton Springs Road) had become a bit too enduring, and the Parklands Events Task Force suggested the city develop a solution to "reduce usage of green space parking." So PARD hatched a plan to turn the ad hoc parking and staging area above the landfill into a more proper (albeit not technically permanent) parking lot, with seven acres of crushed stone and pervious Grasstone replacing the beaten grass and loosely strewn rocks, and a few beautification efforts (walkways, a water detention pond) mixed in. The plan required no action from Council, McNeeley said at a May meeting of the Parks and Recreation Board, and would move forward so long as it got the Environmental Commission's blessing.

Well, that didn't happen, and on Friday, following two June presentations to that body,

McNeeley shelved the plan. She wrote that "PARD believes the proposed project has the potential to address a number of immediate maintenance and operational issues," but acknowledged the concerns that had been voiced, and noted how an indefinite delay should allow her department to "work more inclusively to address the multi-layered set of issues" in the area. Among them:

- Completing a master plan for Zilker Park; · Performing an internal study of traffic, parking, connectivity;
- Exploring shuttle or rideshare opportunities for park access;
- · Assessing the removal of parking from the Polo Fields: and
- Evaluating landfill cap maintenance and remediation options.

McNeeley's memo indicates "this new direction will take a considerable amount of time," but action by City Council may create some sort of calendar. Today (Thu., June 28), via a resolution sponsored by Ann Kitchen, Ellen Troxclair, Leslie Pool, and Alison Alter, Council will consider directing City Manager **Spencer Cronk** to form a working group to consider PARD's options (concerning both the clay cap and overflow parking), and bring to Council a set of funding options for a Zilker Park Master Plan by Dec. 30. The resolution also tasks Cronk with implementing a shuttle system or transpo/parking improvement by March 1, 2019, and conducting a traffic study of the area, to be completed by Dec. 31, - Chase Hoffberger









The Duality of **Southwest Key**

An East Austin nonprofit in the immigration debate

An oversized mural, of children enjoying outdoor activities, adorns the side of Southwest Key's headquarters in East Austin. A yellow-canopied playground sits on the opposite end of a parking lot, nestled up against green trees. Bright mosaics commemorating Latino and African-American community leaders flank the outdoor walkway toward the lobby. The tranquil and inviting setting stands in stark contrast to the cacophony the organization has elicited in recent weeks, and represents an unsettling juxtaposition to the stark images of immigrant children being torn from their parents, to be sent off to Southwest Key's border facilities.

When Oregon Sen. Jeff Merkley was denied entry earlier this June to a converted Walmart in Brownsville that now serves as a migrant youth shelter, it sparked a national uproar, and also shifted attention from the border to our backyard. The Brownsville center was one of 16 shelters owned by Southwest Key that traditionally house unaccompanied immigrant minors, those who cross the border on their own. The nonprofit entered into the migrant detention business in the late Nineties, and has since come to operate 27 shelters in Texas, California, and Arizona. (The organization is currently bidding to build another facility in Houston, where they've been met with local resistance.) But in May, they started taking in children who were separated from their families at the border as a result of Trump's new "zero-tolerance policy," which includes federal criminal



prosecution. As part of that policy, children, including infants, were taken from their parents and placed in shelters or foster homes. Attorney General Jeff Sessions admitted the move was meant as a deterrent for undocumented immigration. "If vou don't like that, then don't smuggle children over our border," he said. Southwest Key has held roughly 500 of the more than 2,000 children that have been separated since the policy.

While Trump's June 20 executive order has seemingly put a halt to those separations, and a California federal judge ruled on Tuesday that the federal government must reunite any family that had been separated within 30 days, it still keeps in place the harsh zero-tolerance policy. Now, children crossing with their parents will be placed in detention centers together - also a grim prospect. And the administration is also seeking to scrap protections that prevent keeping migrant children in detention for more than 20 days. Furthermore, it will still be a challenge to reunite the thousands of abandoned children with their parents. The involvement by Southwest Key has left a sour taste in the mouths of some community members who see the nonprofit as morally complicit in inhumane policies. But the nonprofit's leadership contends they are simply doing their job in the most humane way possible.

"SOMEONE HAS TO DO IT"

Southwest Key was founded in San Antonio in 1987, but moved to Austin in 1990, to an office near St. Edward's University. The organization relocated to Jain Lane between Highway 183 and Airport Boulevard. after being donated seven acres of land, and has since grown to provide a variety of local programs, including East Austin College Prep, from pre-K through high school; Boys and Girls Clubs activities; exercise classes; and a juvenile justice program, explicitly meant to keep kids out of detention centers and jails. Southwest Key now operates in seven states, with a focus on "provid[ing] quality education, safe shelter and alternatives to incarceration for thousands of youth each day, while helping families become economically self-sufficient." According to documents, the city of Austin has financially supported the programs with funding totaling roughly \$1 million since 2006, which includes \$250,000 to help boost a workforce resource center, computer lab, and life skills training. The city also gave the nonprofit a \$624,000 loan in 2005 to construct their corporate office, school, and business incubator.

With deep roots in Austin, the group has drawn both ardent supporters and stark opposition – even before the shelter news. Some, like Education Austin President Ken Zarifis, feel Southwest Key, as a charter school operator, "undermined" public education by pulling students away from Eastside Memorial High School. Zarifis also describes the organization as "needlessly aggressive" in their 2011 attempt to lease the former Johnston High campus for 99 years at \$1 per year ("Which (East) Side Are You On?," June 24, 2011). After that plan was rejected, members directly intervened at the state level by lobbying former Commissioner of Education Robert Scott to halt AISD's plan for the campus. Beyond all

that, Zarifis believes the nonprofit's recent involvement with the child detention centers makes them hypocritical and morally wrong. "If your mission is to love and support kids, I don't understand how you can support the separation of children from families," he said. "I don't know how those two things square away."

Austin LULAC Council President Marcelo Tafova serves as a member of East Austin College Prep's board. He defends the nonprofit, pointing to both their work in education and youth justice and the standards at their migrant shelters, while remaining personally opposed to Trump's family separation and zero-tolerance policies. (National

LULAC is vigorously opposed to the two policies.) Tafoya says children at the shelters receive health care, education, recreation time, and other services. He lauds the Latino-run group for its intimate knowledge of the culture and language of many of the children they oversee. "They don't have anything to do with taking children away from their parents," said Tafoya. "They are providing shelter for these kids. Someone has to do it, so why not them? It's better there than prison."

Foundation Communities Executive Director Walter Moreau doesn't consider Southwest Key part of the tight-knit nonprofit community in Austin, but more like a "big multi-state government contractor." In the thick of the family separation policy, Moreau lambasted the group for taking in children who had been ripped from their mothers and fathers. "When you cooperate with a regime that removes children from parents and try to justify it with 'somehow we would be nicer to the kids than someone else,' that is still morally reprehensible. [Southwest Key] needs to refuse the contract. It's a deal with the devil and any decent organization would say no. Otherwise you are complicit in an inhumane policy."

Some locals who once supported Southwest Key's programs financially or otherwise have since been overcome with guilt. In a letter to Southwest Key dated June 21, software engineer Chip Rosenthal writes that he donated \$100 to East Austin College Prep in memory of student Draylen Mason. the talented young man who was killed earlier this year in the Austin serial bombings. In light of the group "enabling" Trump's heartless policies, Rosenthal now feels regret over the contribution and requests the nonprofit redirect any funds received from government contracts to organizations that are working to support the aggrieved families and children. If they are unable to do so, he hopes his donation can be returned. "The benefit your organization provides to the community is outweighed manifold by its participation and profiteering in this historically reprehensible action," Rosenthal wrote. "It troubles me greatly that I have participated - in a minuscule way, through my contribution in supporting what may be the most morally reprehensible domestic action of the 21st century."

Highlighting the uncomfortable tension between the nonprofit's participation in draconian immigration policies and its ostensible mission to help disadvantaged and minority youth, longtime ally Susana Almanza refrained from expressing any opinion about the nonprofit when reached by phone last week, instead deflecting blame onto the Trump administration. "The focus should be on Jeff Sessions and those creating this racist policy," said Almanza, who in 2013 was inducted into SWKey's Hall of Heroes and now can see a mosaic with her face every time she walks into the nonprofit's headquarters. "And that's all I have to comment about this," she said, before abruptly hanging up.

BIG CONTRACTS, BIG MONEY

While Southwest Key's defenders applaud the organization's shelters for providing comprehensive and compassionate care to children, state records show a spotted history. Last April, a child did not receive the medicine he was prescribed, and another didn't get medication until days later, according to Health and Human Services Commission compliance reports. In October, a staff member showed up to work legally drunk. In 2015, staff did not take a child to the bathroom when he requested and so the child urinated on himself during class. Staff gave a child food that he was allergic to even though he was wearing a bracelet that identified his food allergies. At Casa Padre, where Sen.

deficiencies, saying that in the last three years the group's shelter programs have been evaluated for compliance on 73,292 standards, and he's "proud" less than 1% of those resulted in a violation. "We are not a perfect organization," he said. "Some things we either forget to do or didn't take care of. But we have addressed and corrected every one of those complaints, including terminating some staff."

In any case, despite the violations, the federal government pumps millions into Southwest Key to maintain the shelters. The Trump administration is paying the nonprofit \$458 million, the highest amount among its shelter peers, to run its center this fiscal year, and last year they got \$300

separated from her son, Mateo, after Trump's "no-tolerance" policy went into effect. The two were housed at separate facilities in Central Texas, unaware of each other's whereabouts. However, steadfast efforts by Austin Congressman Lloyd Doggett, RAICES, and local attorneys helped reunite the two, making Luisa and Mateo one of the first detained and separated mothers and sons to meet again. While Doggett calls it a "joyful story amid the misery," he notes there are thousands like them whose fate is still in limbo. Since the Trump administration's execu-

tive order was issued, a majority of the more than 2,000 children pulled away from their families since May - including infants and toddlers - are still in either foster homes or shelters. In helping 300 parents track down their children, the Texas Civil Rights Project has only found two so far. The reunification process is difficult for several reasons, including language barriers and confusion over whom to contact, and may lead to permanent separation. Advocates and attorneys hope the recent California federal court ruling speeds up the process.

Doggett says he recently reached out to Sanchez to find out more about Southwest Key shelters. While he doesn't harshly fault the nonprofit for taking in the influx of separated children, he does believe moving forward that they shouldn't partake in similar policies. "It's bothersome that anyone is playing a role with the separation of families," he says. "I don't know how they could have avoided the quick change in policy in this circumstance but in the future they can take a stand to never participate in this."

Sanchez maintains that his nonprofit is unfairly taking heat for a policy they didn't craft. He promises that the shelters are working to reunite children with their parents and stresses only 10% of its total migrant youth population were children pulled from their families. "If we didn't take these kids in, then who would?" he asks. "We're the good guys in this and we're taking a lot of grief and criticism. But in the end we're proud to be able to take care of these children. That's our job."

During other interviews, Southwest Key remained notably neutral to the practice of the family separation, not wishing to make any direct comment either way. But that changed when Trump signed his executive order on the policy last Wednesday. At that point, the nonprofit issued a release stating their opposition. Sanchez says certain "limitations" kept the group from speaking out against the federal order. Pressed to elaborate, Sanchez pointed to federal contracts.

"You're expected to support the administration in this issue," he told me. "And it's hard to do. They fund you and they expect you to support the policies of the administration."

Merkley was denied a visit, an STD-positive resident wasn't given follow-up medical treatment until weeks later. Some staff have been guilty of yelling at and "belittling" children.

Even more troubling, reports reveal a child was found with a piece of paper that had a staff member's telephone number, and the staff member "appeared to have poor boundaries with the minor." A 2014 incident report says a "child's rights were violated when a staff member of the operation engaged in an inappropriate relationship with the child."

These are among nearly 250 violations found across Southwest Key's 16 Texas facilities over the past three years. And the heightened scrutiny has begat additional details of its neglect: According to Texas Monthly, a former Border Patrol agent who resigned from the agency following his arrest on child pornography charges was subsequently hired as a case manager at Casa Padre. The organization "eventually found out" about the man's pornography charges and suspended him "immediately."

In an interview with the Chronicle last week, Southwest Key CEO Dr. Juan Sanchez minimized the transgressions and million. (The figure has increased each year since 2015.) The federal contracts aren't the only numbers that are rising for Southwest Key: Top-level leadership at the nonprofit have seen a boost in salaries. Sanchez made \$443,000 in 2013; \$659,000 in 2014 (including a \$315,000 bonus); and \$770,000 in 2015, according to IRS filings. His wife Jennifer. the vice president, made \$261,000 that year, while CFO Melody Chung brought in \$530,000. A 2017 report by city staff found that Sanchez was by far the highest-paid nonprofit leader in town, with Goodwill Industries of Central Texas CEO Gerald Davis behind by around \$224,000, according to the Austin Monitor. Last year, Sanchez made \$1.47 million, making him one of the highest-paid charity CEOs in the country.

Sanchez attributes the lucrative pay to humble beginnings, "When we started 30 years ago, we made very little money - no 401(k), no health insurance. Over time, our board has found a way to compensate us for when they couldn't afford to pay much.

"The idea that working for a nonprofit means you should make the least amount of money is a puritanical belief that has to


Between making photos and battling bouts of brain freeze, "Snapshot" dug deeper into it by asking people: What ice cream-related memories come to mind when you're eating it?

eter Bay, conductor and music director of the Austin Symphony Orchestra, is realizing a childhood dream with two performances of Leonard Bernstein's MASS: A Theatre Piece for Singers, Players and Dancers at the Long Center on the last weekend of June.

Even if glorious masterpieces were as common as sand in a desert, this MASS is not just another glorious masterpiece. This *MASS* is a mixture of musical genres, from gospel, blues, rock, and jazz to Broadway and classical, with text by Bernstein and additional text by Stephen Schwartz and Paul Simon. This MASS is a fully staged production that incorporates 300 cast and crew members. This MASS -

"It's the first time that the Austin Symphony, Ballet Austin, Austin Opera, Conspirare, Chorus Austin, Panoramic Voices, and the Austin Children's Choir have all collaborated on a single production," says Bay. "And we're bringing in the African Children's Choir from Uganda. They're touring the United States at this time, and they're going to be part of this."

This MASS is part of - let's go ahead and call it the apotheosis of - the Bernstein100Austin celebration of the late composer-conductor's 100th birthday, a celebration that's included several ASO concerts, a West Side Story sing-along at the Alamo Drafthouse, and any number of official or ad hoc discussions of the beloved maestro and his accomplishments and influence.

One example of Bernstein's influence is embodied by Bay himself.

"I saw Bernstein on television when I was 9 years old," he says. "He used to have the Young People's Concerts at the Philharmonic on CBS four times a year. Can you imagine? On network television: culture. And just seeing Bernstein on TV, and the energy he was emitting - not only when he was conducting the orchestra, but when he turned around and was talking to the audience. I felt like he was talking to me. It was clear that what he was doing was incredibly exciting, and I thought, 'This is cool, this is what I wanna do."

But it wasn't just the televised Bernstein that inspired this raven-haired celebrant of the classical arts who's been leading the ASO since 1998. It was the man himself, in the flesh, at the fourth performance of MASS at the Kennedy Center in 1971. Young Peter Bay was there, having taken a bus to reach the event.

"I was 14," says Bay, "and MASS was the work that had been commissioned to open the Kennedy Center. So I got myself down there, saw the piece, and then I was determined - somehow, some way - to conduct the work at some point. And now, 47 years later ..." He chuckles, this affable Bay, but it's a chuckle suffused with the knowledge of this particular production's demands.



Peter Bay's MASS Appeal

The local maestro brings Leonard Bernstein's monumental stage work to Austin with a lot of help from a lot of friends

"The primary hurdle in anyone trying to perform MASS is the number of people required - and the expense," he says. "Since the first performance I saw was a staged performance, I felt that we needed to stage it here. There have been performances of MASS since it opened, of course, but many of them have been either semi-staged or the concert version, where the symphony, the choruses, they're all on the stage - but without any sets or costumes. We're doing this production as it was originally intended."

You might think that something this grand and complex, it wouldn't be an event that even the Austin Symphony could afford to offer. And you'd be right.

"This is an independent production," says Bay. "It uses the symphony, but the symphony is not producing it. It's too expensive for the symphony - or the opera, or the ballet - to put on. So, two years ago, my wife [Mela Sarajane Dailey] formed a company with her friend Rick [Gabrillo], in order to fund the production - to find the money, get donors, and arrange all the technical trappings of dealing with the venue, the lighting, the set design, and on and on. It was an incredible risk. I've never been part of anything like this before, especially as an independent thing. But I have to hand it to Sarajane, it's happening. I don't know that I'll ever do anything like it *again* – not independently, that's for sure - but, boy, what we've learned."

What you can learn from this article, reader, if you're unfamiliar with Bernstein's magnum opus, is that it's drawn from the composer's exploration of Jewish and Catholic traditions and examines the crisis in faith and cultural breakdown of the post-Kennedy era. Bernstein drew some inspiration for MASS, in fact, while conducting at his friend Robert F. Kennedy's funeral.

"This was written during the Vietnam

War, during the Nixon years, so there was a lot of doubt about everything," says Bay. Bernstein "was a very devout pacifist and didn't understand why we, as a major country in the world, were spending billions of dollars on warheads instead of, you know, educating children or embracing the arts. There's a climactic moment at the end of the 'Agnus Dei' section, where the whole cast is starting to freak out, and on the words 'dona nobis pacem,' - 'grant us peace' - well, it's a rock & roll improvisatory freakout, basically, if I can use an old Seventies term. Everyone goes nuts. The Celebrant can't take it anymore. As in a Roman Catholic mass, the priest or the celebrant is the one who leads the mass. And he stops everything dead in its tracks and he yells, 'Patia! Patia!' and he throws the chalice down, smashing it to smithereens."

The role of the Celebrant in Austin will be performed by Jubilant Sykes. Who, unlike much of the cast, isn't from around here.

"I don't know where he lives," says Bay. "Maybe New York? But nearly everyone in the cast is from Austin, or has Austin connections. And the lighting director, stage director, crew - all from Austin. There are very few that we're importing from elsewhere. But Jubilant's performed the role a number of times, and made a commercial recording of it. We wanted to have an experienced Celebrant, somebody who's taken part in the production and knows the role inside out. It's like, you know, in football, you're gonna draft to get a good quarterback to start - and we've got one in him."

A good quarterback to start - and to finish. Much like Bay has started and will soon finish this work of Bernstein's. And after this complex theatrical marvel? After a man achieves a goal that's been beckoning to him since schoolyard days, what's next? Not hoping to mix metaphors as effectively as Bernstein mixed tropes of popular music into his classical works, but what's the next mountain for ASO quarterback Bay to scale?

"I have a lot of hills to scale after this." amends the conductor. "This is by far the biggest mountain I've ever scaled in my career. I've never worked on something for as long as I've worked on this piece - two years. I'm very lucky to have been invited by Austin Opera to conduct La Bohème which is also a major milestone, any opera is - but, as far as my career is concerned, MASS is probably the most important event I've ever taken part in. And I'm thrilled that it's happening in Austin. Everyone knows how amazing a city this is for the arts, and this is just proof of it."

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Starry Soirée

In Shrewd Productions' The Afterparty, we're invited to hobnob with history's great minds up on the astral plane

Reina Hardy's new play The Afterparty is a story about stars. They are astronomical bodies, so old and distant that they challenge human understanding. To poet Claire (Shannon Grounds), they are mythological beings, mortals tossed from Earth to the heavens by ancient gods.

Claire attracts the attention of one such being (Ja'Michael Darnell) by writing a poem about him. He then appears to her in the form of Devon, a childhood love interest who died when he was 12, before he and

Claire could consummate their very young romance with so much as a kiss. He seduces her, and she soon finds herself on another astral plane.

I am 75 percent sure the above is correct. The exact details of THE AFTERPARTY the plot were fuzzy.

The central conflict in the story emerges in Act II, as Claire realizes that she has (a) been turned into a star and (b) would like to

be human again, with friends and family and artisanal cheese shops and other things that give value to mortal life. (For the record, specialty cheese shops would probably be No. 3 on my list, too.)

The conflict plays out in what the play calls an afterparty, a celestial gathering at which Claire gets to hang out with three geniuses from history, mentioned in Act I when Devon and Claire are bantering as 10- and 11-yearolds, respectively, and Claire's future starry lover was only a twinkle in the sky. The afterparty scenes are the easily the best moments

of the show, when Aristophanes (Rommel Sulit), Johannes Kepler (Trey Deason), and Henrietta Swan Leavitt (Valoneecia Tolbert) provide an amusing counterpoint to the earnestness of the main plot.

The cast in Shrewd Productions' world premiere performs well under Liz Fisher's direction, which keeps the actors in near-constant motion. Tolbert finds the juicy parts of each of her characters. Over the last few years, Deason has evolved into a very effective and

engaging character actor, and his work is enjoyable here. The afterparty itself is so fascinating to watch, with loud personalities that easily agree and disagree, that it's tempting to wonder what a play might look like that

spends all its time there, in the manner of Theresa Rebeck and Alexandra Gersten-Vassilaros' Omnium Gatherum.

The first act, however, is burdened by the oddness

of the relationship between two children who alternate between speaking as children and as late teenagers. The dialogue and performances never quite home in on the curious guirks that steer conversation between fourth/fifth-graders, who are aware that adult things are out there but haven't yet mastered the vocabulary.

Andrew McIntyre's media design and Monica Pasut's costumes are eye-catching and effective. They support the imaginative world of the play, which brings mythology and science into a stage work that is cosmic in scale.



LOCKED-IN

Museum of Human Achievement

June 22

In the beamed cave that is one side of the Museum of Human Achievement, dancers Alyson Dolan, Angie Johnson, Clay Moore, and Lisa Anne Kobdish, in Popsicle-hued separates, flexed their feet into the air, grooving expansively. They examined each other's pockets and appendages before calling out to no one in particular, "Where's my phone?" Along another wall, the band - composer Andy Nolte, the multitalented Leila Louis Henley, Garry Franklin, and Alán De León Uribe - morphed from rock song to ambient vibe to virtuosic improvisation and back again. "From the end of my arm to the end of the world," Nolte sang, referring to the reach of the 4G device.

The dancers found their phones and turned them outward, documenting their own show.


Looking out at both groups from a point opposite the vertex of the L-shaped raised stage, Andrea Ariel, in a tailored purple vest, conducted the proceedings using signals from the conducting language Soundpainting. An amalgamation of ringmaster, conductor, and baseball umpire, the conductor in a Soundpainted performance elicits starts and stops, tone, pacing, volume, and mood from the performers. For Andrea Ariel Dance Theatre's Locked-In, as in its earlier multiyear The Bowie Project, the performers drew from a bank of music, dance phrases, and theatrical

components. In heat that edged toward 100 degrees (yes, A/C is a luxury we now have to shrug off if we want to continue following the work of independent artists, even those as established and acclaimed as Ariel), the show never lost its cool, thanks to the excellent performers, the endlessly delicious play between the musicians and dancers, and the thrill of live composition.

The show's advertised theme, our relationship to our mobiles and the disengagement and distraction that result from this relationship, was, in practice, more complex. Bathed in magic-hour lighting by Stephen Pruitt, the band laid out a xylophonic lullaby

that conjured up (for this Gen-Xer) the sheer marvel of the internet and the mobile network, despite

what constant access to them may do to our heads. In one section, the dancers talked actually spoke - on their phones, as though having conversations with old friends, in favor of habitual scrolling and swiping. The dancing, while sometimes illustrative of the song lyrics in a cool-kid musical-theatre way ("theatre" is, after all, in the company's name), offered plenty of complexity. The dancers rarely touched each other, perhaps because it was too hot for contact, which made each dancer buzz with an aura of aloneness, even as they moved in sync or laughed together. The title itself, its words



clinging together with a hyphen, left space for ponderance. We were not just locked in; we were locked-in, pre-empted, prescribed so, like a fixed interest rate.

A performance that is shaped as it unfolds and executed freely by talented performers is anything but locked in. But the wild gaping heat of the venue, while perhaps not an intended aspect of the setting, did have the effect of wrapping around the show, at best synthesizing with the subject matter and mood and at worst suffocating the experience. Two dancers hung their faces in front of a box fan; Johnson

wiped Dolan's sweat-smeared mascara with her fingers. By the performance's end, Kobdish and Moore's costumes, drenched, were a shade darker than they had been at the beginning. Near the end, Johnson, a dancer with a sort of electric naturalness, was pulled by Ariel's gestures and the music into a dervish state, flinging herself through the thick air as the others reclined, dripping. One worried about her. But if the threat warned against is a world that is cold and sterile, it was clear that we certainly, most definitely, thankfully are not there vet. - Jonelle Seitz



"JAMAL CYRUS AND JULIA BARBOSA LANDOIS: REGIONAL FICTIONS"

MASS Gallery, 507 Calles #108 Through July 7

It may be summer break, but class is not dismissed. In their joint show, Jamal Cyrus and Julia Barbosa Landois traverse school grounds, from the lunchroom to the library to the field, to interrogate old-school nostalgia rooted in exclusionary or dehumanizing tradi-

tions. They wield the weapons of design to do so, considering the narratives told and passed along in terms of visual associations and phrases. What results is "Regional Fictions," a gallery/classroom that challenges the viewer to unlearn and relearn. Walk in,

grab a pencil from the box in the front of the room (mine was red, engraved with "WHERE IN HISTORY IS MY STORY"), and prepare to test the standardized.

In the middle of the room, a desk teeters as one leg is balanced on the spine of a Texas history textbook. The precarity of the sculpture, Propped/Apoyado, immediately contests the surety of history as it is most commonly understood and posits that one's understanding of history is foundational. Throughout the rest of the room, this assertion plays out. Most of the wall space is dedicated to a series of mock-up paper book covers. Such covers are usually passed around with the intent to protect textbooks on loan from the school, but here they set out to counter the authority of the prospective material contained within. Cover #2: Banned Books/Cubierta #2: Libros Prohibidos lists frequently banned and challenged children's books, from Where's Waldo to Heather Has Two Mommies. Cover #1 bilingually repeats my pencil's query in bold letters.

For Bulletin Board/Cartelera, the artists use education supply store bubble letters and scalloped trim to frame drawings and photocopies. These overtly, such as in a write-up of the damage sustained by vandalism of a school started by the Black Panthers, and at times cheekily, as in an elementary-style worksheet prompting, "Place the correct head in the space above," below a photograph of a man armed with a spear and a gun and above a set of black faces, none of which

seem to be the correct head of a bereted Huey Newton, highlight the inherent racism of which narratives are commonly taught within and understood about the school system.

What better exploration of narratives told and bought than that of branding? Throughout the space, the artists work in these terms, creating mini-curricula, vignettes, slogans, and punchy designs, but in Colonial Bread Meets Natives/Pan Colonial Encuentra las Indígenas, the use of branding as device is brilliant and unmistakable. From a pedestal, a Colonial Bread lunch box and thermos confronts a poster filled with black and white graphic renderings of indigenous foods. Slices of white bread topple onto one another like spongy dominoes on the delivery truckshaped lunch box. Just adjacent, a school's self-branding efforts are called into question with a printout of a variety of mascot renderings seemingly on offer for reproduction, ranging from caricatures of Native Americans in feathered headdresses to blackface cartoons.

A smudged projector shines a transparency onto a wall, where pairs of words overlap and thwart distinction: "settler/thief, built/destroyed, the first/the latest." Throughout the space, such juxtapositions of familiar objects, imagery, and phrases create an unsettling interrogation of the education system. Cyrus and Barbosa Landois manage a thought-provoking show that avoids the trap of becoming overly didactic by playing with such familiarity.



Kowalski installed a new smoker shed and equipped it with four 1,000-gallon tanks outfitted with offset fire boxes. He also brought in **Austin Fry** as executive chef and pitmaster. The combination produces brisket cooked to near perfection with an even smoke ring and a minimalist bark.

Texas 46 BBQ has something for everyone. Along with house-made sausage, delicious pork ribs, and a family-size beef rib, the restaurant has a variety of sandwiches including "The Gary" burger honoring the former owner.



As good as the smoked meats are, the sides really step out at this highway diner. The coleslaw has a unique flavor profile that is a little sweet and a little spicy. A standout with the kids and the adults is the creamy mac & cheese.





What's the Deal With Styrofoam Cups and Plastic Drinking Straws?

ZERO WASTE ADVISORY COMMISSION **ENCOURAGES AUSTINITES TO TAKE SMALL** STEPS TO REDUCE POLLUTION by Nina Hernandez

Despite meddling from a decidedly antienvironment state government, Austin still maintains ambitious zero waste goals of diverting most trash from the landfill by 2040. And though state law bars the outright ban of Styrofoam and straws by municipalities, a combination of consumer demand and advocate pressure is helping businesses make better choices in their disposable goods.

Local sandwich stalwart ThunderCloud Subs made news in early June with its decision to eliminate their well-known Styrofoam cups from inventory. ThunderCloud's spokesperson Brenda Thompson said the company was going through a back stock of the old cups. but would change to something more environmentally conscious as soon as those ran out. The positive response online was enormous, and ThunderCloud is just the latest domino in what many hope to be a string of pollutionreducing actions by restaurants.

Other influential industry players are also in the mix. Back in February, Dunkin' Donuts announced that it would nix polystyrene foam cups from its inventory by 2020, and one month earlier, fast food giant McDonald's said it would do the same by the end of

the year. That gives Environment Texas hope that change can come even to a state that bans municipalities from banning Styrofoam and straws. The group turned its attention to Whataburger - and its iconic orange-and-white Styrofoam cups – with a letter to the company last month, but has yet to hear back. Still, the group hopes more businesses will follow the lead of Dunkin' Donuts and McDonald's.

"If one of the [largest chains] in the world can do it, I think certainly the local restaurants in town should be able to find a way to make it happen," said Environment Texas' Luke Metzger. "There's certainly consumer demand for it." Metzger noted that Thunder-Cloud reported an influx of positive feedback surrounding the decision, with some specifically buying sandwiches there as a way of thanking the company.

Since the city cannot technically ban Styrofoam or single-use straws outright after last week's Texas Supreme Court decision, Gerard Acuna, who chairs the city's Zero Waste Advisory Commission, said decisions these companies make about how they operate can make a huge dent in our conservation goals. "We are fortunate here in Austin




that we do have a heck of a lot of wonderful businesses that answer that call to be good stewards of the environment," Acuna said. "We are lucky."

Environment Texas presented to the commission on the issue of straws this spring. but so far it hasn't gained much traction. Acuna encouraged anyone with opinions on the subject to come to the commission with their ideas or concerns. Environment Texas believes the recent ruling that carved up municipal bag bans would allow for a request-only straw ordinance, in which businesses only offer straws to those who ask. That accounts for people with medical conditions that prevent them from drinking without straws, while still limiting the amount of plastic making its way to the landfill. Some

local eateries have already made efforts: J.T. Youngblood's switched to paper straws, L'oca d'oro only serves straws in kids' cups, and El Naranjo does not offer straws at all.

Though the bag ban ruling was clearly a blow, Metzger said Environment Texas is encouraged by a consumer behavior analysis after the extended drought that forced residents into increased water conservation restrictions. The group found that a swath of people maintained their new conservation habits (including watering lawns just once per week), even after the restrictions were lifted. The findings give Environment Texas hope that many Austinites are already too used to reusable options and making efforts to reduce plastic pollution to turn

If you added 15 or so big-screen televisions to Moe's Tavern, recruited some of the regulars from Cheers, and threw in some bar snacks à la Winchester Tavern (minus the zombies and Brits), you'd have Wingzup. This no-frills, locally owned and operated watering hole has been slinging drinks and serving chicken wings since 2011, but more importantly, it's the only dine-in establishment in Hancock Center that has liquor.

In full disclosure: I can walk here from my office. which makes the deadline-day Wednesday special - half-price appetizers and \$3 Jameson and

Jäger shots – all the more appealing. Aside from offering both sliced and speared fried pickles, you can also score a Canadian poutine, a charbroiled burger, or a grilled chicken tender salad. But really, it's all in the name: Wingzup is a wings bar. An entire page of their menu is dedicated to the quintessential American food. Wings are offered six ways (original, golden, boneless, grilled, country, smoked), and there are a whopping 24 sauces and two dry rubs to choose from.

In fact, Wingzup took home the coveted Judges' Champion for Best Wing at the second annual Austin Chicken Wing Festival on Sunday. May 20, and general manager Merrill Frank will probably let you see the trophy up close if you're

really sweet. (Is it a real chicken wing preserved in resin? Is it a 3-D-printed chicken wing?) But the crew of bartenders and daytime regulars really give this place its flavor: They'll remember your drink, they'll keep you company when you're flying solo, and they'll somehow still be in good spirits with an entire bar full of crazy fútbol fans (yes, they're screening World Cup games).

But if that's not enough reason to give this spot a try, maybe your alcohol-induced alter ego wants to vie for her spot in The Ghost Wing Challenge Wingzup Hall of Fame. Just finish 25 original ghost wings - the hottest on their scale - in under 10 minutes without any drinks or dips and, in addition to a gift card and an "I Survived" T-shirt, you'll win a round of applause from Sam, Carla, and rest of the revolving cast of regulars.












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Chennai Cafe

SOUTH INDIAN FARE BRINGS THE HEAT AND OPENS THE MIND by Emily Beyda

There are around 5.000 Indian restaurants in the U.S., and the vast majority serve dishes typical of India's northern region. This is certainly true in Austin, which has a large Indian expat community and some excellent grocery stores. Still, most of our Indian restaurants are North Indian, which means their menus are meat-focused, and tend to use a lot of dairy. Think saag paneer with those chewy lumps of paneer cheese floating in a cream-drenched spinach sea. South Indian cuisine uses a lot of seafood and coconut

and tends to be vegetarian, even vegan. It is very, very spicy. It is also extremely delicious, which is why I was so excited to learn about the existence of Chennai Cafe, a Round Rock restaurant named after the capital of the South Indian state of Tamil Nadu. They're serv-

ing regional specialties I haven't been able to find anywhere else in Texas.

The atmosphere in Chennai Cafe is surreally opulent. One wall is covered by an enormous airbrushed photo mural of a temple, and mood lighting is provided by a million types of lights, including clusters of hanging Tiffany-style stained glass lamps that bathe the room in a soothing rainbow glow. The walls are bright orange; the ceiling is turquoise and dark blue with a thin ribbon of light stretching around the edges of the room. On our first visit, a Sunday evening, the room was crowded with families sharing vast plates of curry and stacks of bread, children climbing in and out of their parents' laps, and a

grandmother wearing an orange sari the exact shade of the walls flashed gold bangles while imperiously gesturing at the waitress. The air smelled amazing, a beguiling mixture of spices and fried dough.

Our waitress brought over a basket full of delicious little fried rings of dough. Crispy and light, with an appealing savory aftertaste, they appear to be some variety of murukku, the popular South Indian snack made from a mixture of rice and lentil flour. We somewhat ill-advisedly plowed through the entire basket

as we waited for our curries to arrive. For our first visit, we made sure to try the sambar. Sambar, a tamarind and lentil brothbased vegetable soup, is so fundamental to South Indian cuisine that if it's bad we might as well just write off the whole meal. Fortunately, it's

delectable and super velvety; the smoothness of the broth was made almost creamlike by the finely ground lentil base. It's smoky and acidic, with the faint punch of tamarind brightening up the tender vegetables. We order idli, a type of savory rice cake, on the side, and they're the perfect blank canvas to soak up all that broth, filling us with a profoundly reassuring warmth.

Next comes the Pondicherry Eral Aasad, shrimp suspended in a thick green mixture of cilantro and coconut. The slow-burning spice of the curry is livened up by the warm pop of mustard seeds, the perfect counterpoint to the sweet brininess of the shrimp. We also ordered the nilgiri curry with paneer, a nod to

our own North Indian cuisine-coddled palates It's made with fresh mint, which could have been overwhelming, but instead expressed itself as a subtle grassiness. The creamy texture and mild herbal flavor caused some suspension of disbelief about the kabillion-Scovilles-hot chile burn, making the paneer a welcome distraction from our burning tongues.

On our next visit, I decided to cut the burned tongue problem off at the pass by ordering a glass of neer moor, a spiced buttermilk drink that's a popular South Indian palate cleanser. It comes in a tall glass, looking like a milkshake, but no milkshake has ever had this lemony fermented taste, or this surprisingly refreshing hint of ginger and jalapeño. It turns out to be the best tongue-soothing accompaniment to the arcot biryani. I've had biryani before, which doesn't tend to be a particularly spicy dish, but I should have known something was up when our waiter returned three times to make sure we had ordered the right thing. It arrived piled high in a copper cauldron, the mutton tucked under a mountain of bright red rice, topped with slices of fresh onion, carrot, and a hard-boiled egg. On the side were small dishes containing some kind of spicy puréed sauce that tasted lentil-based, and plain raita. The rice was amazingly aromatic, with the smokiness of chili and the fat melting off the lamb. Here comes the burn again. The flavor is compelling and though we tried to ignore the burn, dipping the spoon in for more over and over again, those sips of buttermilk between bites were crucial. The raw vegetables ended up functioning as a kind of palate cleanser, providing a little more welcomed relief from the heat.

And the mouth fire didn't let up in the other two dishes we tried. Puzhi kuzhambu poondu was described on the menu as a sour curry, so the intensely spicy sauce was a little surprising, to the degree that the whole cloves of garlic that studded the sauce tasted surprisingly neutral, even a little sweet, in contrast. We also tried karuvadu kathirikkai kuzhambu, a dry fish and eggplant stew. Although our waiter checked in with us about that one as well, even very kindly sending over a gentleman who appeared to be some kind of manager to make sure we wouldn't prefer them to replace the dry fish (which turned out to be a tangle of tiny fried sardines, bones and all) with a nice boiled tilapia. But we stuck to our guns, and I'm glad we did, because it ended up being one of my favorite dishes of the night. The dry fish were super salty and oily, almost like fish jerky, or (and I know how this sounds, but I mean it in a good way) an incredibly fancy cat treat. It was the kind of dish that seems like it might not be your style after the first bite, and I certainly thought so. But then I took another bite. And another. And a few nights later I was lying awake in bed aflame with the kind of intense desire we normally associate with a longed-for beloved, but in my case, dear reader, I was longing for a chili sauce-dredged pile of fried eggplant and fish. This, in a nutshell, is what going to Chennai Cafe is like: It might take some getting used to, but experimental ordering and a willingness to try new things will leave you with a fantastically enriching culinary experience. Saag paneer, who?

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Sicario: Day of the Soldado

Border to Border

SICARIO: DAY OF THE SOLDADO DIRECTOR FINDS INTERNATIONAL THEMES TO TEX-MEX THRILLER by Richard Whittaker

With all eyes turned to the U.S.-Mexico border, and greater attention than ever paid to how America treats migrants and refugees, it can sometimes seem like immigration is a uniquely American issue. But with Sicario: Day of the Soldado, with its steely examination of the wars on drugs and terror, people-smuggling, and the sometimes porous line between soldiers and cops, Italian director Stefano Sollima hopes audiences will see global resonances.

The unexpected sequel to 2015's surprise hit Sicario makes the polar opposite decision to that made by FBI Agent Kate Macer (Emily Blunt). At the end of the first film, she decided she could no longer walk the same dark path as CIA operative Matt Graver (Josh Brolin) and freelance agent of

mayhem Alejandro Gillick (Benicio del Toro), who now become the focus of the next two films. "It was smart to create the idea of a trilogy by using some of the characters," said Sollima. What appealed to him most was the script by Taylor Sheridan (Wind River, Hell or High Water, the first Sicario), which he called "really close to the visceral movies of the Seventies, where you have two antiheroes." In the second film, the pair attempt to trigger a war between the cartels, an effort that backfires for both. "It's not a gentle, educated, just-for-fun movie," said Sollima, "but it's a movie that's going to shake you a bit, and that's exactly the kind of experience I am looking for as an audience, and for sure as a director."

In his native Italy, Sollima cut his directing teeth on TV shows like gritty cop drama La Squadra, and the miniseries adaptation of rise-and-fall-of-a-gang drama Romanzo Criminale. In his 2012 cinematic debut, ACAB - All Cops Are Bastards, he used the Roman riot squad to probe the complex connections and tensions between modern urban life, political protest, and Ultras - die-hard, sometimes violent soccer gangs. With Soldado's dark gray morality, Sollima said, "It was pretty close to everything I had done in my career, so it was a good opportunity to make the transition to work [in the U.S.]."

Sollima saw Blunt's not-so-grizzled cop as "the moral compass" to the first film. This time, he said, "Without having a character who is a filter between you and the characters, you force yourself and the characters to explain themselves deeper." By contrast to Macer, who had to decide if she wanted blood on her hands, Soldado makes Graver and Gillick question how much bloodier they can get, and still call themselves the good guys. Sollima portrays that slippery slope as the inevitable risk when law enforcement bends the rules. "Probably you're doing it in good faith, but at the end the border between the law and criminality is really subtle." As a storyteller, he said, "It's important not having any moral judgment on your characters. [Instead], you create a portrait of the world, that it's a little bit closer to the real world. It's not just a movie. You feel an authenticity, a realism."

As an Italian working in the U.S. for the first time, Sollima only knew about the U.S.-Mexico border, and the power of the cartels in Mexico, from what he read in the newspapers. So, as with all his other films, he undertook a huge amount of research while finalizing the script with Sheridan. "You cannot approach this kind of movie without a lot of information," he said. "I've been at the border, and I've met people, and I've tried to understand how it works."

However, what he quickly saw were the similarities between refugees in Europe and in America, and between the peoplesmugglers criss-crossing the Mediterranean and the borderhopping covotes. Both criminal groups, he said, "get money from desperate people that are trying to survive, and trying to get to a better place to live. It's the same, more or less, all over the world, especially in Europe. We're facing exactly the same issue. We have a lot of people who are literally running from wars. It's not just people trying to live a better life. It's people escaping from immense tragedy."

Fresh Off the Boat

ASIAN CINEMA EXPERT CALLS THIS SITCOM THE SERIES AMERICA NEEDS RIGHT NOW

"Oh, you know, I thought I saw a ghost in the window, but there was not a ghost. I am fine."

Fresh Off the Boat, a seemingly average sitcom about a Taiwanese-American family trying to succeed in Orlando in the Nineties, won me over with a simple joke, perfectly executed by the effervescent and witty Constance Wu. She plays Jessica Huang, a mother of three boys who has an odd obsession – Stephen King novels. She might think Halloween is a silly holiday (unlike her husband Louis, played by the insanely talented Randall Park), but she loves watching and reading spooky stories by the King of Horror himself. Jessica's fascination with all things creepy is an ongoing joke throughout the show: from her son Emery reciting The Silence of the Lambs to calm her down during a particularly stressful road trip, to publishing her own mystery novel in the show's most recent season.

It was Fresh Off the Boat's sly fascination with the macabre that lured me in, but what hooked me was the show's honest, sincere portrayal of the Huang family's daily struggles trying to assimilate into their very white (and understatedly right-wing) neighborhood in Orlando, Fla.

Jessica and Louis adore America. Louis moved his family from the ethnic melting pot of Washington, D.C., to Orlando to open the restaurant of his dreams - a Golden Corral rip-off suspiciously named "Golden Saddle" that celebrates cowboy culture, complete with a giant taxidermy bear in the lobby. Where Louis' devotion to America is big and bold, like his restaurant. Jessica's is quiet and subdued. She worships the holiday of Christmas (but not for religious reasons), and collects little Colonial mice figurines that she keeps perfectly displayed above her fireplace in the dining room. According to Jessica, "Colonial



Americans were like the Chinese of today! Their struggle, their work ethic, their ability to use every single part of the buffalo!"

However, in their neighborhood, Louis and Jessica are still outsiders, as is their rap-loving son Eddie (Emery and Evan seem to effortlessly melt into their new home, with Emery being kind of a ladies' man, and Evan quickly being accepted as a leader of the Homeowners' Association). While none of their neighbors spew hateful words toward the Huangs, the family constantly has to overcome their otherness by proving they are, in fact, no different from them.

This leads Jessica to connecting with her next-door neighbor, Honey (Chelsey Crisp), in the episode "The Shunning." The two women quickly bond over King movie adaptations (of

course) at the local video rental store, but the true testament of their friendship occurs when Jessica spies Honey devouring her Taiwanese delicacies at a block party from afar. Honey relates to Jessica because she is also an other in the neighborhood, a young woman plagued by a rumor that she snatched her husband (Marvin, played by Ray Wise) from his previous wife. Together they overcome prejudice and find themselves in an unconventional yet loving friendship where they can discuss who they would haunt if they were ghosts over wine (the American Dream, honestly).

Fresh Off the Boat is the show we need as Americans right now. It's light and at times silly, but also has impeccable heart and devotion for its diverse set of characters. In the first episode of the third season, aptly titled "Coming From America," Jessica yearns for her new home over Taiwan, and passionately tells Louis, "I know I've been saying how different things are here, how they've changed, but it's not true. I'm the one who has changed, and I'm homesick for Orlando." True, she followed that up with, "I want a bagel," but who can blame her?

No *Damsel* in Distress Here

Zellner Bros. and Robert Pattinson revise the Western for the #MeToo era

Austin mainstays the Zellner brothers have managed to make a Western genre film appropriate for the #MeToo era's audience. As we all know, many cowboy films haven't exactly aged well; but critics tend to excuse them away, like an elderly racist family member, saying "things were different then." Yet Damsel isn't a rebuke or an affront to its predecessors; it playfully extracts elements of earlier films such as Stagecoach and The Searchers especially in the opening scene, which takes place in Monument Valley. That said, the sense of adventure and romanticism has withered - an old preacher (Forster) warns Parson

Henry (David Zellner) that he will find the West disappointing because it's "shitty, in new and fascinating ways" - and there's something a little off about the townsfolk (another Austinite, musician David Wingo, makes an appearance as a condemned man maniacally laughing while wearing a barrel affixed to suspenders). The setting is a little bit of a caricature, yet it's tamer than what we might expect.

Samuel Alabaster (Pattinson, gaunt and creepy in a way that reprises his role in Good Time) strides into the local bar looking for Henry, whom he had previously contacted with a business proposition. He wants the parson to marry him and his sweetheart Penelope (Wasikowska), but he forgot to mention they

have to go on a journey to find her, and oh by the way she's been kidnapped by two wild brothers. Henry is rather reluctantly along for the ride, but when the pair happen upon Penelope, it becomes clear that this damsel was never in need of rescue. Suddenly, there's a fresh perspective on the whole situation.

Wasikowska channels grief and rage with her whole body at times; but she consistently wears a wary but fierce squint that transmits "what the fuck is this shit?" at each new turn of events, namely marriage proposals and their promises of a "fresh start." Every

man in the vicinity wants to claim her, in an absurd succession that brings to mind the Farrelly brothers comedy There's Something About Mary. The onslaught is exhausting, and the Zellners are cheeky about it without completely surrendering to farce. And while we don't learn a whole lot about Penelope's character, her motives are strong enough to carry the second half of the film.

> Though Damsel is ostensibly set in 1870, the expressions of the Old West ("much obliged," "I reckon," and so on) are integrated with more modern

language, such as "gang bang" and "number 1 or number 2" in regard to bodily functions. If we as an audience succumbed to believing this story was actually a period piece, the acts of violence that likely would befall our heroine would be unbearable to witness or even imagine. The filmmakers are

poking fun at the male ego without portraying its more sinister aspects. It's a new spin on an old narrative - a fresh start if you will.

EATING ANIMALS D: Christopher Dillon Quinn; narrated by Natalie Portman. (NR, 94 min.)

With our entire universe in flux - the border crisis, the Space Force, and starving polar bears - what we have for lunch hardly seems critical. Eating Animals sets out to show us exactly how important - and how futuristic, socially conscious, and environmentally imperative - it is that we actively seek information about the origin of our food. Specifically, the animals we eat and their increasingly popular byproducts. However, the problem with this documentary, inspired by a book by Jonathan Safran Foer dedicated to the global effects of meat consumption, is not its intent. It's the execution. And because it's produced (and narrated) by one of Hollywood's finest actors, well-known vegan Natalie Portman, the clout, and expectation, is staggering. I have been researching and writing about food for more than a decade,

with "eating animals" a central theme throughout. I wanted to love this film.

The beginning drags, offering a history lesson about the rise of America's quintessential factory farm, the atrocity-laden, fast food chicken spot, Colonel Sanders' Kentucky-fried empire. When the film gets going, it soon hits cruise control at a steady, vanilla pace. With such a straightforward title, it's a safe bet the filmmakers would prefer all of humanity simply switch gears and stop consuming animals. But that assertiveness never happens.

Certainly, the film's aesthetic is powerful, with the luscious rolling scenes of Midwest turkey farms yin-yanged with downright horrific footage of cruel machinery, inhumane treatment, and deplorable conditions that massproduced factory farm animals suffer from birth to death. Unless you're a sociopath, you agree that no living creature deserves that. The film drops the ball by failing to employ any sort of relatable narrative that could

bring in the viewer and usher in the natural connection between cow and medium-rare rib eye, between heritage turkey and basting instructions on an American holiday, between emotive and intellectual members of a tightknit family and sizzling pieces of bacon.

It's clear that factory farming is the enemy, and Eating Animals would have you believe that some farmers - the former backbone of the American economy - are food industry messiahs, saving us from monoculture and its Beef Council checkmarks. But even for me, an animal lover, a believer in the power of storytelling, and an advocate for meatless meals as often as possible, I just kept waiting for a revelation, or a reason (beyond the horror show footage) to care. Every interviewee is a nice white man, save

for the tearful woman lamenting the loss of her marriage because of her farmer husband's newly adopted advocacy. (The turkey farmer's clear affinity for his flock does pepper the film with some color.) But there it is: There is no emotional connection, no clear call to action, no electric wave of epiphany.

The film aimed to suggest humans ought to take small steps toward reducing meat consumption, supporting small farms and advocating for change at a federal level, and being fully conscious of our food sources. I just wish they'd tried harder to climb down from their luscious cashew milk cabana to talk to people in the real world.

NANCY

D: Christina Choe; with Andrea Riseborough, J. Smith-Cameron, Ann Dowd, John Leguizamo, Steve Buscemi. (NR, 87 min.)

When the story is told of the cuckoo in the nest, everyone thinks about the innocent baby birds thrown out to make space for the interloper, or the cuckoo who laid the egg, or the birds left raising someone else's offspring. No one ever thinks about what's going through the baby cuckoo's head.

Nancy Freeman (Riseborough) is dislocated from life, a talented but unskilled writer who never got a break, daughter to a woman (Dowd, continuing a year of outstanding supporting performances that runs through The Handmaid's Tale, American Animals, and Hereditary) who depends on her, but can seemingly scarcely tolerate the way she drifts through life. When her mom dies, suddenly if not unexpectedly. Nancy becomes quickly convinced that she is not Nancy Freeman, but Brooke Lynch, a young girl who disappeared on a shopping trip 30 years previously. Now Nancy turns up at still-grieving parents Leo and Ellen Lynch's house, saying she may be the missing part of their lives.

British actress Riseborough (Oblivion, Birdman) disappears into Nancy, playing her with the grimy demeanor of a crumpled, discarded nylon parka. That's a reflection of her firm belief that she was a castoff as much as a changeling, out of place and unwanted by the woman that raised her. Her penchant or addiction to tragic narratives is deep in her. She's caught in one major lie by Jeb (Leguizamo), who managed to fall into her orbit online, and the audience's trust in her is quickly crumpled. But just because something seems extraordinary, does not mean it's untrue. Riseborough keeps even her strangest traits and stories plausible, an essential anchor to keep this potentially - and it's always potentially - unreliable narrator sympathetic.

But Nancy's dark appeal is not just in Riseborough's remarkable performance. It's in how Leo (Buscemi) catches himself saying

"you," and corrects himself to talk about what he and Brooke did before she disappeared. It's in how Ellen (Smith-Cameron, burying grief in blind hope) is so eager to believe that this strange, sad-eyed woman is her missing baby, miraculously returned to her. It's also in the deft and somber touch of first-time feature writer/director Christina Choe. She evokes the pained compassion of Atom Egoyan at his finest, neither maudlin nor absurd, even when the material seems fantastical. Her story is of people searching for a few rays of hope in the depths of their own tragedies - even if a little bit of self-delusion is what that takes to get through the day.

SICARIO: DAY OF THE SOLDADO

D: Stefano Sollima; with Benicio Del Toro, Josh Brolin, Isabela Moner, Jeffrey Donovan, Manuel Garcia-Rulfo, Matthew Modine, Catherine Keener, Elijah Rodriguez, David Castaneda, Shea Whigham. (R, 122 min.)

Forget about good guys and bad guys. It's almost impossible to know with certainty who's who anymore. And if the location is the (currently wall-less) U.S.-Mexico border where much of Sicario: Day of the Soldado is set, the demarcations are even more porous. After the film's opening sequences, during which responsibility for a Kansas City suicide bombing is attached to Islamist terrorists who apparently crept into the U.S. through its southern border, CIA operative Matt Graver (Brolin) is called to Washington by Secretary of Defense James Riley (Modine) and his attaché Cynthia Foards (Keener). While tasking Graver with upsetting the comfy status quo of the Matamoros drug- and human-smuggling cartel, the cabinet member informs the covert agent: "Dirty is exactly why you're here."

Screenwriter Taylor Sheridan traffics in these kinds of ambiguities. The shadings between right and wrong are highlighted in the original Sicario, as well as the films Hell or High Water (which was nominated for an Oscar) and Wind River (which Sheridan also directed; his penchant for modern Westerns has carried through to Yellowstone, a new TV series, which he both writes and directs). For this follow-up to the 2015 film, Sheridan has crafted a twisty tale that leads characters (some innocent, some rotten, some with scores to settle, and others just trying to survive) out from the shadows and into the glare of the daylight, which further distorts the shaky lines between good and bad. The film's overarching story is solidly scripted, although it lags somewhat in the second act, and the government figure played by Catherine Keener is woefully undeveloped (an especially sore point since Emily Blunt in the original film portrayed such a formidable female lead).

Alas, Blunt is not back for the sequel, nor is director Denis Villeneuve. Neither is the late music composer Jóhann Jóhannson (whose menacing score was the first film's secret sauce) nor acclaimed cinematographer Roger Deakins. However, Del Toro's cryptic hit man (aka sicario) Alejandro is given more dimension in the sequel, where story strands are also developed to show the effect that the border's rampant criminality and violence has on its blameless children. An unexpected epilogue opens a door for future sequels that might emphasize the recruitment of the next generation. Sollima (director of the Italian TV crime show Gomorrah, but not the identically titled movie) and his cinematographer Dariusz Wolski (The Martian) don't manage to eke out as much tension and visual shock as did the Villeneuve and Deakins combination, but Sicario: Day of the Soldado nevertheless is fluid, efficient, and bloody.

Coincidentally coinciding with our great national debate about the future of the U.S.-Mexico border, the release of Sicario: Day of the Soldado should gain some extra heat from that simmering conflict. Yet it would be foolhardy to look for guiding lights in a movie populated by feckless government officials, ruthless criminal gangs, and bribed law enforcers. Perhaps if Sicario becomes on ongoing franchise, the children who are swept up into this madness (much like the ones in attendance at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School) can help lead the way out of the quagmire.





AMERICAN ANIMALS

Where is the line between fact and fiction in documentary cinema? Blurring the border between documentary and crime drama, American Animals offers a unique take on the Transy Book Heist, the 2004 robbery of several rare books from the Transylvania University campus in Lexington, Ky., by four unlikely suspects. The performances (Keoghan and Peters especially) and pacing make for a snappy enough heist film, but those who sit down blindly may be surprised to find a second element in play. Director Bart Layton (responsible for the equally slippery The Imposter) includes direct interviews with real figures from the heist. Sometimes they are even inserted into the fictional narrative, and as a result, American Animals is as much an exercise in objective truth - or the lack thereof - as it is the retelling of a single series of events. AVENGERS: INFINITY WAR

When we last visited the Marvel Cinematic Universe, the outlook was bleak. Which means Thanos, a deranged genocidal maniac seeking the Infinity Gauntlet (Marvel's grand MacGuffin) to murder half the universe. Only the Avengers (and affiliated heroes) can possibly stop him, on Earth and far beyond. There has not been a fiery-hot galaxy of stars assembled onscreen like this since the great wartime ensembles of the Sixties and Seventies. But most importantly, this is Thanos' film, and under the makeup and CG, Brolin strides like a brilliant, broken force of nature. There is darkness, lightened by whip-smart warfront humor, but most importantly, in bleak times on and off the screen, the Avengers give us something vital: hope. (04/27/2018)

AUSTIN FILMMAKERS NEED YOUR CROWDFUNDING HELP



Target: \$15,000 by July 25.

What are the perks? \$50 gets you early digital access to the finished short, while higher pledges include a wrap party invite and dinner with the director. Head on over to Indiegogo to help them reach their goal.

Outside the Box draws on video logs from a recent research study to uplift and humanize homeless narratives through well-timed comedic elements. After two years of preparation, filmmakers Gabriel Auffant, Colton Bostick, and Christopher T. Lovett are ready to shoot a 30-minute pilot, but need to raise \$9,450 via Kickstarter by July 11.

"First Generation" blends 2-D animation and stop-motion film to tell the story of an astronaut on her way to Mars in 2034, as she reflects on the significance of her mission, the cosmos, and the future of humanity. This is UT undergraduate Aaron Chávez's third directed project after "The Day You Were Born" and "Catastrophe." The project is over halfway to its \$500 flexible goal ending July 17 via Indiegogo. -Charlie Neddo

After Avengers: Infinity War broke our hearts, now Ryan Reynolds slides into his too-tight neoprene and Kevlar onesie to help us heal them a little bit in Deadpool 2, with the inevitable arrival of his nemesis/best bud from the comics Cable (Brolin, growling and snarling with appropriate disdain); he's a supersoldier from the future, sent back to dispatch a young mutant called Rusty Collins (Dennison) who will be responsible for untold horrors. Only Deadpool thinks that killing kids is, y'know, wrong. Reynolds knows that Deadpool isn't just a wisecracking scumbag. At heart he's a nice guy who is really, really annoying, and that's such a katana-thin edge to walk on that it's always breathtaking to see Reynolds not just cross it, but waltz and booty shake down its shaft. FIRST REFORMED

D: Paul Schrader; with Ethan Hawke, Amanda Seyfried, Cedric the Entertainer, Victoria Hill, Philip Ettinger, Michael Gaston, Van Hansis, Michael Metta, Gary Lee Mahmoud, Frank Murray. (R. 108 min.)

Paul Schrader's ongoing crises of faith regarding both God and man show no signs of temperance whatsoever in First Reformed. Hawke gives the most devastating and best performance of his career to date as Reverend Ernst Toller, a priest who blames himself for his son's death in Iraq and the collapse of his marriage. His grief is compounded by the arrival of pregnant parishioner Mary

(Seyfried), whose husband Michael (Ettinger) can discern no point in bringing another life into what he views as a dying world. First Reformed hums disquietingly along at Schrader's own clockwork pace which, like Hawke's mesmerizing performance, is austere, stoic, and ultimately self-destructive. 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

When Artificial Intelligence Meets a Failing Mind

SCI-FI DRAMA MARJORIE PRIME QUESTIONS HUMAN IDENTITY by Richard Whittaker

Every time Marjorie recounts a story to her husband Walter, his refrain isn't, "I remember that now." Instead it's, "I'll remember that now." That shift from present to future tense is pivotal because he cannot recall those moments from their marriage - flags in the park, the death of their son, what bad film was playing when he proposed - because he was never there. Walter is not Walter. Walter is Walter Prime, a sophisticated AI serving as Marjorie's companion. The real Walter (Jon Hamm) has been dead for decades, while 86-year-old Marjorie (Five Easy Pieces' Lois Smith) is going senile. When she tells Walter a story, it is what she thinks is the truth. When he recounts it to her as her memory decays, then it is like the first time she has heard it.

2017's Marjorie Prime reboots this week at the AFS Cinema as part of Science on Screen, bringing researchers and movies together for a post-screening discussion of how technology responds to our reality. This time, it's two scientists from IBM's Austin research lab: Al designer Adam Cutler, an expert in artificial intelligence, and Master Inventor Susann Keohane, whose specialty is the use of technology and aging - two key issues at the center of this near-future domestic drama.

Smith originated the part of Marjorie (a beautiful contradiction for a story that depends on interchangeability) when Marjorie Prime debuted onstage in Los Angeles in 2013, and returns as the fading widow. Marjorie's son-in-law Jon (Tim Robbins) believes that even the illusion of her



deceased husband - a specter of him from his youth – will help her (a position with which his wife, Tess, a technophobe as played by Geena Davis, profoundly disagrees). But is this Walter really Walter, or just an illusion recounting stories? Does having Walter's "memories" make him Walter? If so, what does that mean for Marjorie, whose own sense of self-identity is fading with her mind?

Jordan Harrison's original Pulitzernominated play (adapted here by writer/director Michael Almereyda) tackled the inherent mystery of artificial intelligence designed to emulate the human mind: How can we replicate what we scarcely understand ourselves? Almereyda concentrates on the theme of memory as reconstruction, rather than data storage, and history as a communal act created by consensus. Nothing is immutable, not even the environment: The outdoors is shown either in the perpetually shifting form of the ocean, or in an artistic re-creation (including a particularly resonant use of John Vanderlyn's Panoramic View of the Palace and Gardens of Versailles, a 165-foot circular canvas that envelops the viewer). In Almereyda's world, our sense of self is as impermanent as paint and sand.



Kinky Friedman: Between the Lines

Kinky Friedman's getting old.

"I'm seventy-fucking-three," he sighs over a landline from his **Echo Hill Ranch** in Medina. "Though I read at the 75-year-old level."

In the pantheon of Central Texas' surviving outlaw songsmiths, Friedman remains the little brother. **Willie Nelson**'s 85, **Kris Kristofferson** 82, and **Billy Joe Shaver** clocks in at 78.

Still, Friedman's getting long in the tooth. His hearing's going to shit, his animal rescue facility has been downsized to a couple of donkeys, and uptight people are making him grumpy. Not long ago, police stopped him leaving the Kerrville **H-E-B** after a customer complained that the one-time gubernatorial candidate was smoking a cigar while shopping.

"It wasn't even lit," he steams.

Meanwhile, Friedman's other oral fixations – singing and songwriting – have proven unusually productive of late. Tuesday's *Circus of Life* marks his first album of original songs since 1983's *Under the Double Ego*. Devoid of goofball, Jew-sploitation and envelope-pushing ballads, the 12-track LP wells up with tender and spacious life reflections (see "Texas Platters," June 1).

"I've written these songs between the lines," he reveals. "So you can actually think while you're listening to them."

Austin Chronicle: Every track on Circus of Life feels like an homage – to your friends, your guitar, your pets.

Kinky Friedman: You really hit on something fuckin' weird because I never consciously set out to do that. I was pretty miserable when I wrote this shit, which is always step one if you want to be a songwriter. They came really fast, but look-

ing back over it, I see so many dead sweethearts and lost cats. It's like I'm writing to a silent witness.

AC: In my favorite song, you depict **Jesus Christ** returning as a homeless person at **Denny's**. What inspired that?

KF: "Jesus in Pajamas" actually happened to me. This guy in a dirty green knit cap came into a Denny's in Dallas. He wasn't even begging, he was trying to sell me a coupon. I always give money to a guy like that, but I didn't have any cash. After I left, I was overcome with guilt, so I came right back and he was gone. I asked the cashier where he went and she said she hadn't seen a guy in pajamas, which didn't make sense because he was hard to miss. So I wrote that song on the way to Ft. Worth.

It's a universal Christian message. Back when Kristofferson was the most talented ... uh, janitor in Nashville, that's the kind of song he would've written, but he didn't. It took a Jew to write that. **AC: Nelson Mandela**'s fondness for your song "Ride 'Em Jewboy" always blew my mind. Can you specify how he came to know that? **KF:** I went to South Africa in 1996 and Nelson Mandela's right-hand man, **Tokyo Sexwale**, who was a prisoner with him at **Robben Island**, told me Mandela was a fan of mine. I assumed we were talking about books. Then Tokyo said, "Don't get a swell head Kinky, because you were not Mandela's favorite country singer – **Dolly Parton** was – but he listened to your music."

They smuggled in cassettes to Robben Island and very late at night he'd play them so some of the other prisoners could hear. Tokyo heard him play "Sold American" a few times, but he mostly played "Ride 'Em Jewboy." That was his sign-off song – the last thing he'd play at night.

HALF NOTES

BARBARA LYNN has been named recipient of a \$25,000 fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts. The Gulf Coast R&B guitarist and vocalist, best known for the classic 1962 single "You'll Lose a Good Thing," retains a deep, abiding association with Austin, including records issued on the Antone's and Dialtone labels. On July 10, she'll play at Antone's Nightclub, where she's been a fixture since the Seventies. Previous local recipients of the prestigious grant are late fiddle legend Johnny Gimble and Tejano innovator Manuel "Cowboy" Donley.

POR LOS NINOS, a concert for separated families at the Texas border that features performances from Cecilia & the Broken Hearts, Chulita Vinyl Club, and Kiko Villamizar, runs Saturday 2-6pm at the Hard Luck Lounge. Organizers will be selling barbecue chicken plates and taking donations to raise money for RAICES, a nonprofit providing legal defense for migrant families affected by Trump's zero-tolerance immigration policy. "Cruelty towards children as a deterrent to immigration is a moral issue," says Hard Luck owner Denis O'Donnell. "The prevailing narrative needs to be 'Diversity is strength.' That's who we are as a nation."

BETO O'ROURKE spends the **Fourth of July** at **Hotel Vegas**. The Senate candidate, whose recent polls show him closing in on corporate worm **Ted Cruz**, will speak and meet supporters. The free event, beginning at 4:30pm, features performances from **Selena** tribute **Manos en el Aire**, Chicana punks **Fea**, Cumbia funkers **Bombasta**, and Latin indie orquesta **Volcán**.

THE SAXON PUB'S airport restaurant has closed, "Playback" noticed while flying to Detroit on Friday. The Gate 5 eatery, decorated to look like the classic South Lamar songwriter haven, occasionally featured live music, but was best known for having really bad chicken wings. In related news, the **Chronicle** gift shop wouldn't give me an employee discount on a \$5 bottle of water.

MARCUS ABOGADO, a local music scene fixture who booked bands, ran sound, and served as the local-act liaison for Transmission Events – in addition to being a helluva nice guy – is moving back to Seattle. Austin sends him off on Friday with a eight-band bill at Mohawk, including Octopus Project, Young Tongue, Palm Days, and Megafauna.

That's better than a Grammy. You never know who you're gonna reach with music.

AC: Who would you most want to hear Circus of Life?

KF: I'd like for my parents to have been able to hear it. They were super supportive of my music.

AC: Given voters' recent rejection of establishment political candidates, do you wish you would've waited until now to run for governor?

KF: Yeah, the time you run is just crucial – especially if you're an independent. It's like a country singer's career: You have to die at the right time. I will say this, politicians only fear one thing, and that's guys like **Donald Trump** and **Kinky Friedman** and **Farouk Shami**. They're afraid of outside people getting into politics.

AC: You pay tribute to Willie Nelson's generosity with the new song "Autographs in the Rain."

KF: That's a thank-you note to Willie. I've asked him for 500 favors and he only said no once. He was in my video [How To Lose Friends & Irritate People] with **Dwight Yoakam** and **Don Imus**, and he said it was the "stupidest fucking thing" he's ever done in his life and it was. I hit him up for another favor right afterward and his response was, "Find another sucker!"

"Autographs in the Rain" is about a time there was a long line of fans by his bus and it started raining. Willie just kept signing autographs and he didn't have somebody holding an umbrella over him. That says a lot about who he is.

He still inspires me. I'm doing 40 solo shows with no days off. That's a Willie idea. Days off throw you off, but if you run on adrenaline, your shows will be pure and raw.

AC: The tone of Circus of Life is finality. Will this be your last record? **KF:** No. To quote **Gustave Flaubert**, "I would not like to die before having emptied a few more buckets of shit on the heads of my fellow men."

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Raise Her Voice

Arts umbrella Human Influence stirs Austin's musical diversity melting pot

Austin's billed as the live music capital of the world, but look around. That's only true for certain demographics. Creative collective Human Influence exists in opposition to said dynamic.

Founded in 2015 by UT grads Christopher Omenihu and Henry Smith, the arts umbrella expends its bandwidth building a platform for musicians, writers, and other local artists in unconventional genres and communities. Human Influence connects and displays talent. The volunteer organization hosts monthly showcases, including all-female residency Raise Her Voice at Cheer Up Charlies and live-producing DJ performance "Beat Garden." Raise Her Voice hosts

Rapper and former economics major Omenihu, who graduated in 2016, felt estranged from his peers in college, and guessed he fell into an entire demographic also looking for a tribe.

"How do we include everyone who wants to be included?" asks the Dallas native today.

Omenihu, who now works at an ad agency in Los Angeles, met studio arts major Smith through mutual friends and the duo discovered a gap in the local market for connecting young hip-hop artists and people of color with music industry opportunities. The aural arts, in particular hip-hop,

remains a young man's game, and Omenihu felt that older Austin hip-hop crews such as Dirty Wormz and Boombox often skipped past a thriving younger crowd.

"The old guys don't have help for you," he admits. "You might be overlooked because you're trying to innovate."

Kicking off Haus Party showcases in September 2015, Omenihu and Smith began reaching out to underrepresented groups.

"All the things we knew were diverse are like a Crock-Pot with no power," injects Omenihu. "There's no stirring or cooking."

Raise Her Voice, formerly hosted by local powerhouses Mélat and Torre Blake, began

spring 2016, but took breaks between the inaugural two showcases and lacked consistency until Jarisha Onezine took the reins. Currently Human Influence's operations head,

Onezine, a caretaker of the elderly pursuing a nursing degree, met Omenihu at his Pearl Street Co-op rap show (revisit "Omenihu: Dream Killers Bow to TLC, July 11, 2017) and soon took over booking and promotion of the series, securing a residency at Cheer Up Charlies and often hand-picking acts.

"It's not just about doing events or shows," points out Onezine. "It's about people. Connecting people."

Madriz weeks later on her

"It's hard for female artists to network," agrees singer Katherine Gualy of Raise Her Voice feature band Jade Vine. "When guys are drinking they start thinking about other things. Are you asking for my card because you want to network, or to take me out for a drink?"

Human Influence hopes to massage this

process and expose female talent to more opportunities.

"Austin lacks knowledge of opportunity," says Onezine. "There's opportunity out there for artists who are female and/or people of color, but there's just a lack of knowledge about how to get to it."

"There's a new movement pushing through Austin for people who are different," proclaims Gualy. "Human Influence is part of that."

Selena and my dad is a fan of all things cowboy, so it was a good excuse to get some new Western wear.

The show was amazing. I was 13 and had fun, but I would have appreciated it so much more if I could have gone when I was older. I was a little bummed I had to wear a long suede skirt with fringe, and a shirt with crazy shoulder pads and more fringe. Not my style at all.

What, if any, pattern did this set up for your ensuing showgoing, and what did you glean from your first show? This didn't really have an impact on my showgoing. I didn't have any friends who knew about Selena, so I just lumped it into music my parents listened to and as a family event. Seeing Tom Petty a few months later at The Woodlands was more of the beginning of showgoing with my friends. Why a career in the music business, and did Selena influence your professional path? I wish I could say that Selena influenced my career, but she did not. She was an amazing person that left too soon. A career in music was really just a hobby that led to a career. I loved local bands and putting together shows, and having my friends come out and have fun. Since I can't play any instruments this was my contribution to the scene.


MATT MUÑOZ, MANAGER, CACTUS CAFE

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

ERIC HISAW BAND Street Lamp (Reservation Radio Records)

Since relocating to Austin in 1990 at the age of 18, Eric Hisaw's steadily perfected his self-proclaimed "roadhouse rock" and Southwestern noir songwriting. That world remains filled with desperate, tenderhearted characters living in filthy motel rooms reeking of booze, sweat, and stale cigarette smoke, while trying to scrape together enough change for one last phone call to a lover who's not coming back, or maybe for a gas station hot dog and a few tallboys. Worse still, we haven't heard from these wellintentioned chancers since 2011's Ghost Stories. Holing up in Boerne's Poverty Studios with Shawn Sahm producing, contributing keyboards, and lending some authenticity to the closing cover of Doug Sahm's "Revolutionary Ways," Hisaw and band have emerged with bracing rockers including "Hurry It Up" and the title track, which bridge Stonesy raunch and Bakersfield twang. Accordion by the Texmaniacs' Josh Baca adds Tejano spice, especially on ballad "So Close." Then the bandleader evokes both his New Mexico youth and Merle Haggard's ornery spirit on boot-scooter "Reservation Radio," echoing Hag guitarist Roy Nichols' best riffs throughout. Eric Hisaw couldn't have pulled that off at 18. - Tim Stegall

THE SWORD Used Future (Razor & Tie)

After a pair of moldbreakers and a live disc, what's next for the Sword? More experimentation? Back

to basics? In the case of Austin's onetime metallurgists, both. Sixth album Used Future revs up behind "Deadly Nightshade," an asskicking rocker showcasing the local quartet at its bombastic best. Alas, the Sword doesn't stay in its wheelhouse. While "Book of Thoth" and "Twilight Sunrise" stick the same landing, the title track swims in the neo-classic rock waters in which the band has recently waded, now gone tepid. "Nocturne" gamely attempts synthesized prog rock, while "Come and Gone" dissipates on a Southern rock breeze. Like any forward-looking act, the Sword continually leapfrogs out of its comfort zone, but when the results come up wanting, the drawing board comes a-callin'.

PAUL CAUTHEN Have Mercy EP (Lightning Rod Records)

Paul Cauthen's 2016 solo debut, My Gospel, introduced the towering Texan's booming baritone, cutting

between Waylon Jennings' rollicking power and Elvis Presley's trembling croon. New extended-play Have Mercy arrives as a necessary holdover, but not without evolution. First of seven new songs, "Everybody Walkin' This Land" summons Johnny Cash in a God-fearing anthem, yet with Texas Gentleman Beau Bedford producing, the mini album dives deep into country funk grooves more akin to Tony Joe White or Jim Ford. "Resignation" rolls as playfully as Bob Dorough's Schoolhouse Rock!, complete with whistling and rhyming vertigo, whereas "Lil Son" and "Tumbleweed" flash My Gospel's galloping Southwestern flair. The

title track sears low and defiant, but closer "In Love With a Fool" offers an unexpected highlight. The Dan Dyer co-write swoons as smooth as a cosmic cowboy love ballad, wanting only for soaring strings to match Cauthen's deep well of want. Have Mercy picks up where My Gospel left off: just getting warmed up.

BOB LIVINGSTON Up the Flatland Stairs (Howlin' Dog)

Bob Livingston helped define Austin's progres-

sive country sound in the Seventies, but the Lost Gonzo Band co-founder has done his best work this century. On 2003's Mahatma Gandhi & Sitting Bull and 2011's Gypsy Alibi, Livingston unrolled an increasingly eclectic and far-reaching sound while remaining true to his Lubbock songwriter roots and soothing tenor. The 17 tracks stomping Up the Flatland Stairs offer an impressive, if noncohesive collection of covers, co-writes, and originals. His ear for digging others' deep cuts exhumes Jerry Jeff Walker's "Shell Game" with a Dylanesque harmonica at the outset, and cuts of David Halley's rocking "A Month of Somedays" and Walter Hyatt's swooning "The Early Days" shine. Gonzo Band classic "Public Domain" swings impeccably tight, but duets with Eliza Gilkyson ("That's the Way Things Go") and Kelley Mickwee ("Cowgirl's Lullaby") shade tenderly, and Bud Shrake piano ballad co-write "We Should Have Stayed" serves up a latealbum highlight. Livingston's song instincts remain impeccable no matter the style.

THE WATTERS

Having hopped around the country prior to their current Austin abode, husband-and-wife duo the Watters pay tribute to their



geographic and musical ventures on a sophomore release. Opener "I Need You" launches their immediately familiar feel-good, big-band, old-school assembly. A sevenpiece setup of bright horns (lent by the Shinyribs crew) and generally groovy aesthetics cushion Jenna Watters' crystal clear vocals, sometimes grasping at soulful Feist. Waxes on love and relocation continue into chipper collab "Soul to Soul," unleashing Daniel Watters' twang-dusted lyrics and bluesy guitar lines. "Set You Free" commits its final half to a gospel organ solo under honeyed, tumbling brass embellishments. The couple largely reins in the sonic inconsistencies of debut Great Unknown, aside from one Disney duet patch working sultry jazz ("Something in the Stars") and a theatrical Iull ("Along the Way"). A stormier direction unfolds the three final tracks. Jenna leading thoughtfully somber dives into an odyssey of relationship tumults. Despite the elemental fusion, the collection maps a developmental road stretching ahead for the traversing twosome.

THE BUTTS (Get a Job Records)

Born in Illinois 12 years ago, then moving to Austin in 2009, melodic brat punks the Butts soon found them-



selves playing many a night at Headhunters. If you barely listened to their second CD, you might mistake this for the pop-punk specialized by Blink-182 or Sum 41. Yet their rowdy spirit and boozy snottiness breaks the well-manicured power chords plied by those groups. Founding Butt Kurt Koegler and Nathan Holman's massed guitars roar like crazy, Ryan Henderson's drums slam your guts hard, and Kevy Bergman's bass provides thick Dee Dee Ramone-like support, while her high harmonies provide a nice counterpart to Koegler's ratty bark. Hits like "The Creature Under the Stairs," "Deadbeat Dad Day," and "Village of the Dumb" hit the back of your head like a shower of spitballs from the back of detention hall. The Butts, recorded loud and clean, and mastered loud enough to rattle your fillings loose.

WILSON MARKS Peregrine

If the artwork of Wilson Marks' sophomore LP doesn't signal the uncanny, haunting contortions of Peregrine, opener "Save the Nest" sets the tone. The local jazz marksman takes a folkier turn, resulting in a collision of Nick Drake with Ralph White on "Couldn't Drain the Devil," his



patient, nasal vocals floating in sustain atop twisted chords and unexpected progressions. Piano tracks "First and Last" and "Tacit" unfold like Randy Newman's softer moments, and "Petrichor" paints a dark, atmospheric, instrumental mural sliding into the more heavily jazz-influenced second half. Mesmerizing and endlessly surprising. ★★★

MARCIA BALL Shine Bright (Alligator Records)

Marcia Ball's fingers spark a party when they touch the keys. Shine Bright is a revel in tough times, the 2018 Texas State Musician of the Year as ever digging into her New Orleans roots for rousing grooves and anthemic declarations. Sax blasts against

her incomparable piano boogies, but her vocal range constraints remain and the lyrics scan as an afterthought to the rollicking music. Molly Ivins' hellraiser "Pots and Pans" serves as a timely standout alongside a cover of Ray Charles' "What Would I Do Without You." ★★★



TISH HINOJOSA West (Tish Records)

After nearly a decade in Germany, Tish Hinojosa returned to Austin mending heartbreak on 2013's After the Fair. Now, West flashes the promise of a songwriter fêted among the best and brightest locally during the Nineties. Her voice luminescent, emotive, and strong in tenderly



constructed tunes, Hinojosa's songcraft likewise regains its peak luster on the title track, Southwestern ballad "Church of the Mission Bell," and Western swing "Can't Say It Matters Anymore." Jimmy LaFave's "Only One Angel" trembles to the classic jukebox sway of Chip Dolan's "Cryin' Out Loud." Hinojosa's third act brims with renewed inspiration. ★★★

Touring has forced Amanda Shires out of the closet, but not in a Pride Month sense. Shires and her husband, fellow singersongwriter Jason Isbell, have made some unexpected tweaks to their creative process since their daughter Mercy entered the stage where she wants to help with everything.

"We've had to do all of our writing in a closet in our house because she's 2-and-a-half, our daughter," says Shires. "That's been an adjustment for sure, just having to be in a tiny small spot amongst all of your words and instruments and shoes. It's not as glamorous as you'd think."

After only a few moments chatting with the Lubbock-born fiddler, 36, one gets the sense she can adapt to any situation. When her iPhone stopped working moments before our

> interview, she popped into a gas station in Tennessee and borrowed a phone from a store attendant ("Technology, bringing people together!"). And when Nashville superproducer Dave Cobb suggested running Shires' violin through a pedal while tracking her sev-





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
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
