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
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STRIVE FOR HUMAN VIRTUE

EADLINES

AFTER A MARATHON June 28 session – adjourning just shy of 4am Friday - City Council takes its summer hiatus, with the next regularly scheduled meeting Aug. 9, when budget preparation resumes in earnest, among a long list of pending business. See "1,020 Minutes Later ...," p.10.

CODENEXT SPENT MONDAY morning in state district court, where anti-CodeNEXT petitioners argued that the city must put the question of the code rewrite on the November ballot, and attorneys for the city responded that state law prohibits public referenda on zoning. See "CodeNEXT: Will We or Won't We Vote on It?," p.10.

ALSO ON MONDAY, a federal court blocked the Trump administration's crackdown on immigrants fleeing persecution or violence in their native countries. U.S. District Judge James E. Boasberg ruled that the government must immediately release or grant hearings to more than 1,000 asylum seekers who've been jailed for years without case reviews. ICE has ignored its own policy that asylum applicants who establish a "credible fear" of persecution in their home country must be given a court hearing within seven days or released, said Boasberg.

COMPUTING FIRM DELL is going public again. The local institution was bought back by founder and philanthropist Michael Dell and investment firm Silver Lake in 2013, but now will issue shares again in a planned \$22 billion stock sale. The company made its early reputation for desktop PCs and laptops, but as that market has shrunk, it's increasingly moved into data services for big business.

NOW THAT DUCKY-PAJAMA-WEARING

Rep. Blake Farenthold, R-Corpus Christi, mired in sexual harassment accusations, has stepped aside. Republican Michael Cloud looks slated to replace him, albeit temporarily. Cloud won a special election on Saturday, beating out nine other candidates. He'll finish out Farenthold's term, which ends in January, and go head-to-head with Dem party nominee Eric Holguin in November to decide who gets the spot for the full term.

DEATH WATCH: CHRISTOPHER YOUNG.

a Texas death row inmate scheduled for a July 17 execution, is hoping for a new trial instead. On Monday, his attorneys asked the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals grant him a new hearing, arguing religious discrimination - of a potential jury member - tainted Young's original conviction. Alliance Defending Freedom, a public interest organization protecting First Amendment rights, filed an amicus brief to support Young's claims. See more in next week's issue.

COUNCIL'S SUMMER DAZE LEAVES PLENTY OF WORK IN PROGRESS

City Council's summer hiatus – when any council member with a lick of sense hides out for a couple of weeks - provides an annual opportunity to take stock of Council

business, and the large matters looming for the remainder of the calendar. Last week's marathon meeting gave a 128-Item, overnight sense of the current workload and unfinished business. (One permanently unresolved project involves the promise made on the campaign trail by Mayor Steve Adler and nearly every current council member that

there would be no further need for latenight Council meetings. Alas ...)

Once they return, their primary business is of course the FY 2019 budget, yet to be submitted by rookie City Manager Spencer Cronk. Based on spring projections by the Budget Office, this year's product is likely to be roughly akin to last year's, not necessarily a good sign. Deputy Chief Financial Officer Ed Van Eenoo told Council in April

that the city's structural expenses are rising about 5% annually – and revenues are not quite keeping up. "If the budget is growing four to five percent per year," Van Eenoo said, "I need everything to grow -[but] the sales tax, utility fees, and everything else is growing less than four to five percent."

That means that once the operating fund big-ticket items (public safety, then everything else) are budgeted, based on annual projections, there will be little left over for Council prerogatives notably the perennial attempts to meet social service needs with the few million

left over at the end of the process. Council has already made its job more difficult by voting to increase the homestead exemption by another 2% (bringing it to 10% total, or half what the 2014 Council-elect promised on the stump). That blows about a \$5 million hole in operating funds, for a lagniappe of about \$30/year, or \$2.50/month, for the owner of a median-priced home. Spend it wisely.

BONDS TO COME

While not precisely a budgetary matter, Council did vote also to approve a draft omnibus bond package for November (confirmation scheduled for August). At \$925 million, it's larger than the \$720 million tally approved by voters in 2016, with the most expensive item an unprecedented \$250 million for affordable housing. That's less than the \$300 million endorsed by advocates, more than the \$161 million

proposed by the Bond Election Advisory Task Force. It would pay for land acquisition and housing construction, as well as maintenance and upgrades for existing housing stock.

It will also have to live or die on its own, since as drafted it would ballot separately from each of the other bond proposals: public safety, transportation, flood mitigation/open space, parks, libraries/cultural centers, health and human services. (That final category is proposed at \$16 million - it could have used an infusion of \$5 million now heading for the homestead exemption.) In recent years, Austin voters have remained mostly supportive of bonds in general, while blowing hot and cold on affordable housing.

It will be interesting to see how the bonds interact with the Council election. The package passed 8-3, with nay votes from Ora Houston, Jimmy Flannigan, and Ellen Troxclair. Houston is stepping down and Flannigan isn't up for election this year; perhaps Troxclair will run against the bond, and her three progressive opponents will presumably position themselves accordingly.

A FREE KICK

Another huge matter of unfinished business is of course CodeNEXT, which theoretically was going to be accomplished by now but instead resides in a limbo of Council considerations and litigation. The latter involves a potential district court decision to require the city to place the anti-CodeNEXT petition on the ballot essentially to freeze the code rewrite until after the next Council election (November 2019). The case was argued Monday; if district Judge Orlinda Naranjo rules that the question must go to the voters, presumably that will suspend the current Council deliberations, and we can all blame each other for another year of delay.

How about some soccer? In the wee hours of Friday, Council voted both to pursue negotiations with the Precourt Sports Ventures group hoping to install a Major League Soccer franchise at McKalla Place, while simultaneously considering other potential developments for a city-owned site that has lain fallow for years. Setting aside the cross-purposes – city staff inevitably responds to Council directives, "Your wish is our busy-work" - that decision might also end up in court, by opponents looking for a reason to block the deal.

I'm personally agnostic on soccer. I think it would be fine to have a team in Austin (sans vuvuzelas), but should it come, the "community benefits" we get in return for whatever city underwriting eventuates should be more tangible than a friendly place to gather, cheer, and drink beer on a Saturday night. Ideally, that should be an ownership interest, perhaps along the lines of that afforded the citizens of Green Bay with the NFL's Packers. What say you, City Manager Cronk, late of Minneapolis ... can you list that among your negotiating terms? In our dreams ...

CodeNEXT: The Halftime Score?

Is it just **World Cup fever** that has me thinking of things in terms of sports scores? Probably so, but anyway, it kind of feels like we're at a halftime break of sorts, when it comes to the harder-than-it-had-to-be rewrite of the city's land development code. City Council has finally wrestled the beast onto the dais, asked everyone to take a breather while they take their well-deserved July break, and we'll be back into the fray in August, or so.

It's not like the World Cup group stage. though, because the scores don't reset. The work done so far in the process definitely carries over, so if you view the code rewrite simply as a struggle between the **urbanists** and the **preservationists**, it's fair to ask, who's ahead at halftime?

And if you look at it that way, I think it's clear that the current draft is an overwhelmingly one-sided win for the urbanists. The parking

reductions that appeared for the first time in draft three with minimums cut in half for starters, then reduced further, down to zero parking required for any bars and restaurants under 2.500 square

feet - are a huge change from the current code. Add in considerable upzoning of particular neighborhoods, especially in the rest of the Eastside, plus changes in regulations citywide to allow more residential units on smaller lots, with less public notice or review, and you have a lot of changes in the direction of encouraging denser housing forms in the place of single-family houses, and squeezing car owners to encourage transit, walking, and biking. Those are high-value goals for the urbanist team, though they do come at some costs in terms of affordability and livability.

For the traditional neighborhood advocates and residents, though, there's little to cheer: the barest of nods toward preserving the dwindling supply of "market-affordable" housing for either homeowners or renters, and really, nothing else but various degrees of bad news. Parking would get worse, upzonings and increased entitlements mean property valuations and thus housing costs and **displacements** would almost certainly rise in the short term (at least until the new highend units begin to trickle down toward affordability), the rights to notice and appeal would be curtailed, and - to balance all that - there are none of the protections against displacement and gentrification that they've been ask-

> ing for. To be fair, a lot of those actions have to happen outside of the land development code, but Council has yet to commit to a program of anti-displacement initiatives such as preservation districts and a "right to stay" policy that Eastside advocates have been asking for for a long time - initiatives that would nicely complement the record affordable housing

ask in the upcoming November bond package (see "Hurry Up Please, It's Time," March 9, and "People's Housing Justice," April 13). So really, I'm seeing this as a shutout so far, and hoping for a comeback, because this isn't a sport, and the whole point is to not have winners and losers.

(Most importantly, no one has yet committed to the sort of fine-grained, context-based applications of the code – small area plans, essentially, that account for actual conditions on the ground in specific areas. And that's an issue where nobody wins, because that sort of planning has to be the underpinning of any final product. But that'll have to wait for second overtime, I guess.)

While it seems the rest of the city is on vacation or hiding to stay cool, your civic servants are hard at work

PARD says the DAC has been found "beyond repair ... a temporary structure meant to be razed in the 1970s," and Butler Shores fits a lot of the needs. If you like the idea or hate it, PARD is taking feedback through July 25 at www.austintexas.gov/dacproject.

Boring! The city Transportation Department will be doing a lot of boring work for the rest of the year along the nine transit corridors included in the Corridor Construction Program adopted by Austin City Council in April. Geotechnical boring, that is - taking soil and rock samples, to prepare for construction funded by the 2016 mobility bond ("It's Going to Take a Long, Long Time," June 8). NAKED CITY: IMMIGRATION EDITION

CITY EXPLORES CREATING IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS OFFICE

With no signs that attacks on the immigrant community will slow down any time soon, Austin City Council on June 28 voted through a measure to get the ball rolling to create an Office of Immigrant Affairs. The resolution directs the city manager to review what's in place in other cities that have similar offices (for example, Dallas) and report back on how the city can up its investment in protecting immigrants. Part of that task includes exploring options for funding a clinic to help immigrants learn how to become citizens. Austin is home to the largest refugee resettlement site in Central Texas, with about 57,000 Austin residents eligible for citizenship, according to city documents.

Sponsored by CMs Delia Garza, Leslie Pool, Greg Casar, Pio Renteria, and Mayor Steve Adler, the resolution came after council members visited the "tent city" in Tornillo. Texas, that houses more than 300 migrant children torn apart from their families when crossing the border as a result of (now reversed) federal policies. The item wasn't just about the logistics of a new office but also about showing opposition to any policy that ends in separating children from their parents or in the mass incarceration of immigrant children. "I proposed this resolution to send a strong message to the immigrant community that Austin has leaders who will stand up and fight for them, that the immoral and un-American Trump policies do not reflect who Austin is or the values of our community," said a passionate Garza during a press conference at City Hall last week. "We must do everything that we can to support immigrant families in Austin and across the country." - Mary Tuma

CASA MARIANELLA REUNITES FAMILY SEPARATED AT THE BORDER

On July 1, local immigrant shelter Casa Marianella posted to its website the story of a family from Congo - a pregnant mother in her third trimester, a 6-yearold daughter, and the father - who were separated at the U.S.-Mexico border. Casa Marianella and Posada **Esperanza**, the sister shelter for mothers with children, provided the care and logistical resources needed to reunite the family. The father was eventually released from detainment, and five weeks after being sent to a Chicago agency for unaccompanied minors, the child was returned to her parents. The family is being housed together at Casa Marianella, and the mother is due to give birth this week.

In addition to food, shelter, and basic needs for new immigrants and asylum seekers, the two East Austin organizations coordinate health and legal resources. advocates, educational and ESL classes, tutoring and homework help, and activities to uplift this vulnerable population and help residents "navigate the confusing social service system and make an exit plan."

The call is out for **volunteers**: cooks, administrators, tutors, homework helpers, appointment advocates, and more. Casa accepts some donations on-site, and their website has a donation wish list for both orgs. "It is bittersweet to feel so much happiness for this family as our hearts break for the thousands of parents and children who have not yet been able to return to each other's arms," concludes the post. "We are doing our absolute best to reunite families, and your donations are directly supporting our efforts." - Jessi Cape


ACTIVISTS PROTEST SOUTHWEST KEY AT CEO'S HOME

Roughly two dozen activists gathered just west of MoPac at Allen Park last Thursday evening to denounce Southwest Key, an East Austin nonprofit that runs 27 migrant youth shelters in three states, including 16 in Texas. Activists slammed CEO Juan Sanchez for accepting "blood money" and called on him to leave Austin. The protesters, part of newly conceived local immigrant rights group Frente de Liberación Inmigrante, walked from the park to Sanchez's home with the aim of directly asking him to end the organization's hefty government contracts and give up his lucrative salary. The group also called on the city of Austin to break its grants and contracts with the nonprofit, which runs a variety of programs including a charter school. Southwest Key has raked in \$458 million this year from the feds to run their shelters, and Sanchez earned \$1.5 million last year, one of the highest charity CEO salaries in the country, as the Chronicle reported in last week's cover story.


The Frente de Liberación Inmigrante, formed this June, seeks to combat "detention, deportation, and militarized borders," and the "exploitation of immigrants and refugees." Ken Zarifis is working with the group as an individual activist independent of his role with Education Austin, the teachers' and employees' union for AISD. "We can't overlook the opportunity to call out this behavior and make him accountable," said Zarifis. "While the detention centers are all over Texas, Sanchez is right here in our backyard." M.T.

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




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1,020 Minutes Later ...

EPIC MEETING SENDS COUNCIL INTO SUMMER RECESS

It's only fitting that the last City Council meeting before the summer break would clock in at a mind-boggling 17 hours, and include approval of a \$925 million bond proposal that includes a historic \$250 million in affordable housing dollars, deregulation of the taxi industry, an extended Austin Rowing Club row, and a decision at long last to start negotiating a deal that would bring Major League Soccer to Austin (p.12). With their adjournment just before 4am on Friday, June 29, members officially clocked out for the July recess, in which they'll take a well-deserved breather from briefings, public hearings, their own interpersonal squabbles, and, of course, CodeNEXT. Hope they enjoy the R&R; they'll be back for a regular meeting Aug. 9, when all of those vexations will come rushing back.

A HISTORIC INVESTMENT

What started as an \$815 million bond proposal eventually grew by \$110 million due to pressing needs in each of the funding buckets. CMs added another \$7 million in pool funding, a \$12 million boost for the Mexican American Cultural Center, and \$12 million in creative space dollars. The bloc advocating for \$300 million in affordable housing spending didn't get exactly what it asked for, but Council will put its largest request ever in front of voters in November. That money will go toward land acquisition, rental housing assistance projects, and homeownership and home repair programs. Mayor Steve Adler called the move "a significant and major statement about who we are as a community, and what our priority is and what our value is."

That isn't to say everyone was in agreement on the scale of such an investment. Predictably, Ellen Troxclair gave a tired sermon calling the decision to invest in housing instead of roads (which also got nearly \$180 million in funds) a "strategic mistake." Jimmy Flannigan closed the conversation by harshly criticizing the process, saying that the Bond Election Advisory Task Force had passed the tough decisions on prioritization to Council, and that he and his colleagues were shirking that responsibility. Nevertheless, the beefed-up bond passed 8-3 (with Troxclair, Flannigan, and Ora Houston voting no). Besides the housing portion, the final version included:

- \bullet \$149 million for parks and recreation,
- •\$160 million for transportation.
- •\$184 million for flood mitigation,
- •\$128 million for libraries & cultural centers,
- •\$38 million for public safety, and
- •\$16 million for health and human services.

CodeNEXT: Will We or Won't We Vote on It?

Travis County Judge Orlinda Naranjo spent Monday morning presiding over Austin's land use petition case, but dismissed the court before 1pm without issuing a ruling. With a deadline looming – a decision must be made before Aug. 20 in order to have an effect on the November election -Naranjo promised to rule soon.

The lawsuit was filed against the city by a group of anti-CodeNEXT citizens on June 1, following City Council's vote to not put the petition – which called for a waiting period and public vote on CodeNEXT (and all future comprehensive zoning rewrites) to a public vote. However, the council members who voted against the petition did so with the intention of bringing about a lawsuit that would force a judge to weigh in on the petition's legality. Specifically: whether or not state law allows residents to vote on zoning ordinances.

Attorneys Bill Bunch and Fred Lewis two plaintiffs in the case - argued in favor of the petition (which Lewis helped author), while Jane Webre, a lawyer with local firm

Scott, Douglass & McConnico, represented the city. Both sides agree the proposed land use code covers both zoning and non-zoning issues, and that no one knows what the code rewrite will actually entail because, currently, there is no final draft. Because the rewrite remains in draft form, and likely will for some time, Lewis argued that November's election would have nothing to do with zoning law. If Naranjo rules in favor of the plaintiffs, voters will decide whether or not to enact a waiting period before CodeNEXT could be implemented, if approved by both Council and voters (at a future, undetermined election).

Both sides' arguments waded into complicated case law dating as far back as the 1920s, and attempted to decipher state Legislature limitations and allowances. Lewis said that not putting the petition on the ballot, after more than the required 20,000 signatures were gathered, "violates [the] people's power." In closing, he voiced his belief that CodeNEXT - as it's proposed today would displace more Austinites and "destroy neighborhoods." Residents, he said, "deserve the right to be heard. ... This is not about CodeNEXT, this is about democracy."

The plaintiffs' case also relied heavily on the rewrite's lack of completion, arguing that CodeNEXT is not inherently about zoning because Council's intentions are not yet clear. Lewis suggested Council could decide to continue with the city's current zoning, while Bunch called draft three's zoning chapter a "small part" of the rewrite.

But Webre, using what she called a "road map" of the case, argued that, in the majority of situations, state law does not allow residents to vote on zoning issues. Webre approximates that draft three's zoning chapter (totaling more than 600 pages of the 1,565-page document) takes up 45% of the rewrite, but emphasized the "tentacles of zoning" are felt throughout the draft. Therefore, she said, it's all but impossible to separate zoning from the rest of the code.

Furthermore, Webre argued that while Texas law allows for the voter-led right to petition to initiate legislation or repeal existing ordinances if City Council refuses to do so

(known as the initiative and referendum process), some "subject matter" has been deemed inappropriate for that process. Zoning, as argued by the city, is one of those subjects. In legalese, zoning is exempt from referendum because it requires mandatory procedures under state law. As such, both city planning commissions and councils are required to hold public hearings, which have been publicly posted, for each zoning case, due to the technical nature of zoning, and because "you can't have a hearing before the entire electorate," said Webre. This, she said, is why Council voted to keep the petition off the ballot, and why her team has asked Naranjo to affirm that decision.

It's uncertain when Naranjo will rule, but as she dismissed the court Monday afternoon she acknowledged both the upcoming holiday and truncated timeline. "I understand we're working with a short fuse," she closed.

Council's To-Do List

Before taking off the month of July, Council spent last week attempting to outline their next steps for CodeNEXT. Closing their Wednesday, June 27, special called meeting, interim Assistant City Manager Joe Pantalion

A NEW ERA FOR AUSTIN TAXIS

Times were already changing for Austin cabbies. But with its action on Thursday, Council essentially ripped the Band-Aid off. For decades, way before the arrival of transportation network companies, the cab industry has worked under strict regulations that govern the number of drivers companies can have on the road, how much they charge, what their cars look like, and how they calculate fares. The new rules will loosen a lot of those regulations; Transportation Director Robert Spillar told Council the "overhaul" is an effort to allow the companies to compete in today's market without those burdens.

Though the change is inevitable when you consider that the state just made it so TNCs can operate without municipal meddling, it's easy to see why a vocal contingent of industry players showed up to express their concerns about the new era. Late last year, when staff was still working on the proposal, Austin Cab's General Manager Ron Means predicted the monumental shift would create "chaos" in an industry already struggling for breath. Only time will tell if the city's move helped or hurt.

QUARTER-CENT SHUFFLE

The night might not have stretched on quite so late had the group not taken an early detour because of CM Houston's objections to a deal to direct \$6 million of Capital Metro quarter-cent funds back to the organization so it can finish its **Project** Connect study on high-capacity transit, which is of interest to anyone who lives in Austin proper or accesses it via the surrounding metro. Houston pushed back strongly against the proposal both during Tuesday's work session and the regular meeting on Thursday, complaining that the

city would be giving away cash that could be used for a tangible community benefit in exchange for a promise of high-capacity transit that may never be fulfilled.

That put Houston at odds with CM Ann Kitchen, who advocated for approving the measure without delay. She told Houston the city wasn't "doing something for Cap Metro," but merely helping it with a component of work that's already in progress. In a statement after the proposal passed, Houston bemoaned the fact that the city entered into the partnership with Cap Metro "even though for the last three years as council member I have witnessed the voices and priorities of many transit dependent Austinites, whether by necessity or preference, be silenced or simply ignored. Here is yet another example of that disregard and lack of consideration for the needs of parts of the broader community."

LET THE RECESS COMMENCE

Hours after Adler called the meeting adjourned, council members were already scattering for the July break. After a hectic spring, everybody more than deserves a little time to kick their shoes off and put their feet up. But that'll only last a few short weeks. There's a regular meeting scheduled for Aug. 9. Once the CMs return. it won't be long before they become embroiled in budget talks. They, along with City Manager Spencer Cronk and Deputy Chief Financial Officer Ed Van Eenoo, have been circling the city for the past several months to find out what constituents feel should take priority. The really tough part will be reconciling those competing interests when it comes to putting together the final product. We wish them luck.

confirmed that an online portal has been set up for CMs to post their suggested rewrite amendments. Unlike agenda resolutions, which require four co-sponsors, these, Council decided, can be offered by just one member of the dais. Also discussed, but still undetermined, is which draft of the rewrite will serve as Council's base motion going forward. Currently, there are two options: the staff recommendation with addendum (also known as draft 3.5), or the

Planning Commission's recommendation. That debate should happen shortly after Council reconvenes in August; those dates, however, have yet to be decided.

The following night, Council took up Ellen Troxclair, Jimmy Flannigan, Ann Kitchen, and Mayor Steve Adler's resolution directing the city manager to organize a group of "design and development professionals" and technical experts to test regulations proposed in CodeNEXT. Troxclair said her goal is to verify whether the zoning and technical chapters are "jiving," while Adler hopes a transparent process will offer residents clarity and another chance to weigh in on the process. (Testing on the proposed policies has been conducted by several stakeholder groups, but neither that process nor its conclusions were widely publicized.) Council passed the resolution, as amended by **Alison Alter**: The process will mirror the Texas Open Meetings Act, lobbvists are not allowed to be chosen as "experts," and staff will provide feedback on the forthcoming recommendations. CodeNEXT staff is moving forward, with the goal of getting some answers to the dais "fairly quickly," said project executive lead Greg Guernsey.

TX AG PAXTON SEEKS TO REMOVE EIGHT OF **AUSTIN'S PLANNING COMMISSIONERS**

The Texas Office of the Attorney General has officially entered Austin's land use debate. On Tuesday, a Travis County state district court granted AG **Ken Paxton** approval to proceed with a lawsuit seeking to remove eight of Austin's 13 sitting **Planning Commissioners**. The response came less than 24 hours after Paxton filed the quo warranto. which claims the eight appointees "unlawfully hold positions" on the land use commission.

Under the City Charter, only one-third (or four members) of the Planning Commission can be "directly or indirectly" connected to development or real estate. Currently, the commission, which has played a huge role in readying Austin's land use code rewrite for City Council, is in violation of the charter. As called out by the anti-CodeNEXT group Community Not Commodity earlier this year, the commission was over that count by at least three members.

The issue came before City Council in May, and after a couple of weeks of fiery debate (according to city legal, the charter does not instruct on how or if a Planning Commissioner can be removed), the dais passed 6-4 a resolution directing the city manager and city clerk to determine which members qualify as "connected" to development, and identify a process for removal. However, Community Not Commodity and the Austin chapter of the NAACP had already filed paperwork in the fall with both the district and county attorneys' offices. Both directed the claims to the attorney general.

As for the number of commissioners said to be tied to development, that continues to change. In April, CNC pointed at seven members, but that number should have dropped when architect and longtime Chair **Stephen Oliver** stepped down in June. Paxton, however, has bumped the number to eight - Karen McGraw, Trinity White, Fayez Kazi, James Schissler, Tom Nuckols, Patricia Seeger. recently appointed Chair James Shieh, and Greg Anderson, director of community affairs at Austin Habitat for Humanity – a nonprofit that provides deeply affordable housing in and around the city. Anderson told the Chronicle, "I work for Austin Habitat for the same reason I'm on the Planning Commission, which is that I believe in the power of sustainable, healthy communities."

The lawsuit asks a judge to decide if the appointees are in fact breaking city law by sitting on the (all-volunteer) commission. If a judge sides with Paxton, the AG's office will remove the commissioners in violation.

In a statement released Tuesday, Paxton said. "It's shameful that the city of Austin ignores the will of voters and its own city charter, allowing the planning commission to be controlled by eight real estate professionals who unlawfully hold seats on the board. We're seeking the court's removal of all commission members whose appointments violate the two-thirds 'lay member' requirement of the city charter."

City legal has informed the named commissioners that they will be defended and all costs will be covered. - S.M.

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Countdown to a Deal

CITY TO WORK ON SOCCER STADIUM DEAL WHILE FIELDING OTHER DEVELOPMENT OFFERS

At the tail end of a 17-hour City Council meeting last week, several council members were standing behind the dais, doing all they could to keep from passing out. It was nearing 3am, and they were listening to the public rattle on about why Austin needs a Major League Soccer team, or why subsidizing such a team would be a costly mistake. Soccer proponents urged Council to let Anthony Precourt pay for and build a 20,000-seat MLS stadium on the city-owned 24-acre lot at 10414 McKalla Place in North Austin. On the other side, neighborhood activists pushed for a competitive process in which other developers could submit their ideas for what to do with the land.

In the end, both sides prevailed. City Manager Spencer Cronk was directed to spend the next five weeks negotiating with Precourt Sports Ventures, and at the same time, his office was directed to create an "opportunity for any person or entity to send a plan for use of McKalla Place," according to a change in the resolution's language recommended by the city's Purchasing Office just hours before Council was to vote on the measure.

By the time council members got to debating the resolutions, it was clear most of the dais had already made up their minds on how to vote, so the discussion functioned more as a sounding board for each CM to state their position on MLS in Austin. Every council member made clear that the decision that night was merely to continue negotiations with PSV - not to proceed with a deal. CMs Leslie Pool and Alison Alter. who have both been vocal in their skepticism of Precourt's proposal, again said that a process in which competing ideas for how to develop McKalla would lead to the best deal for the city. Reached Monday, Pool said that the best deal would include a new rail station at the stadium, fully funded by PSV – a must-have for her vote.

CM Greg Casar had remained relatively quiet publicly on the potential deal, but he came out of the meeting with a clear cut position: He can vote for a potential deal with PSV, if the final plan includes affordable housing on-site. He amended the negotiating terms in agenda Item 130 to require a minimum of 130 units of affordable housing at the McKalla site (such a plan was introduced as a concept by PSV two days before the Council meeting), higher wage standards for employees at the stadium, and the establishment of a "formal inclusion plan," which would promote inclusiveness through community engagement in choosing a team name, as well as by providing affordable ticket packages for lowincome families.

developers to submit their plans for McKalla persisted Monday, as representatives for PSV and a development partnership interested in the site struggled to understand what the submission process would look like. Introduced by District 7 CM Pool, where McKalla Place is located, agenda Item 60 initially sought to create a "solicitation" process in which devel-

opers could submit their own proposals for how to develop the lot which has remained vacant for decades. City Purchasing Officer James Scarboro objected to that language, noting that from the city's perspective, a "solicitation" process implies creating an "objective basis for comparison" that could be used to assess best use of a given property. Because the proposed uses of McKalla are so different - a sports stadium vs. a mixed-use development - Scarboro concluded that "it may be difficult to identify meaningful bases of comparison," so he recommended a different procedure which would not trigger a formal procurement

Anyone will be able to submit their plans to develop McKalla through Aug. 3, so long as the plan adheres to the goals outlined in Pool's resolution (see "Soccer in Austin: The Knockout Stage," June 29), and the plans will be viewable by the public on the city's McKalla Place landing page. When Council meets on Aug. 9, they will be able to discuss all options for the site, and presumably vote on which plan will best serve the city's interests.

At this point, the process is open-ended (Scarboro's memo notes that "staff would not proscribe any format on how one would submit their plan for use of McKalla Place, nor what type of information they would need to include," so the possibilities could be endless), which will be beneficial to developers who haven't invested the time or resources into formulating a fleshed-out proposal like PSV. One group ready to delve further into the McKalla submission process is a pair of private developers, John Chen and Marcus Whitfield. They submitted a plan for McKalla as an unsolicited offer to the city manager in early June, and Chen said Monday that they're prepared to provide more information to the public and to city staff in the near future. Chen referred to "well-known local and national" partners his group was in discussions with to build affordable housing at the site (their plan calls for a minimum of 500 affordable units), but he could not disclose those partners. He said more information would be available in the coming weeks.

One of PSV's consultants, Mark Littlefield, was riding high Monday morning. He described feeling a wave of momentum after the positive comments that flowed from the dais at last week's meeting. "There Confusion surrounding the process for were two partners to this dance Friday

morning," Littlefield waxed poetic, "And when the meeting was gaveled closed, both partners were smiling and excited." But he acknowledged that much of the enthusiasm from Council was tempered by a determination to negotiate diligently with the PSV team. Which is where the process is now headed: For the next five weeks, PSV lawyers and city lawvers will lower their

heads and work out the terms of the deal. But what will happen in the first two weeks of August when Council returns to a finetuned deal with PSV and a presently unknown amount of other pitches for McKalla will be the next question for spectators to puzzle over. - Austin Sanders

Still Seeking Relief

DESPITE NEW MANAGEMENT, PRIMROSE RESIDENTS FACE MOLD, BROKEN A/C, AND SECURITY ISSUES

Two years ago, residents of an apartment complex called **Primrose of Shadow Creek**, advertised as a 55 and older community, raised the alarm about conditions at the property. The Chronicle reported how, in August of 2016, residents of Building 2 – some of whom have medical conditions preventing them from using stairs – were temporarily trapped due to an out-of-service elevator. But that was just one of myriad complaints about conditions on the property, including broken air conditioning units, mold, and inconsistent trash collection.

Residents charged that the then-managers, Pinnacle Equities, weren't properly maintaining the property, which sits on land owned by the Austin Housing Finance Corporation. The city's Neighborhood Housing and Community Development Office said it was looking into the matter, but that rents were too low for the management to keep things in much better condition. Staff also pointed out that tenants had begun to organize.

Fast forward two years, to a meeting of the **Concerned Citizens of Primrose Tenants Association** in the complex's information center and clubhouse. The property is now under control of **Good Harbor Management LLC**, and a group called BASTA has been helping tenants organize these planning meetings to secure better conditions. Charmaine Boston, a resident on her second lease with Primrose, is pushing her fellow tenants to keep putting pressure on Good Harbor. "This is where we have to live," she told the group. "And this is where some of us may die. But until then we've got to live here."

She wrote the Chronicle in June in the hopes of renewing community concern about the place, describing many of the issues raised by tenants in 2016. "To go into detail would be like writing a novel," she wrote. A/C units go too long without repair, she said, and black mold still grows on vents throughout her building. She said she and her fellow residents live in fear because the security gate around the complex is often broken down or circumvented by nonresidents. "Everybody in town" knows the code for the gate when it is in working order, she said.

The repair issues dominated discussion at the meeting. Residents would like to see their repair orders filled more quickly, and increased security to address property crime issues associated with the flimsy gate. And while the units have working air conditioning, many of the complex's common areas including the clubhouse where the meeting was held - are conspicuously without. At 26, and in relative good health, I felt weighted down by the heat during the hour-plus meeting. The elderly residents working to improve their community may as well have been sitting out in the evening heat. Boston told me she often has to apologize to her guests for the conditions outside of her own apartment, because she has no control over the maintenance in those parts of Primrose.

Boston and the group's planning committee handed out repair order forms at the meeting and encouraged residents to document the problems in their units and turn them in to management. The group hopes that consistent pressure on management will result in the changes it seeks. The Chronicle checked in with Austin Code about the issues, and learned that the office had received 31 complaints between September and April of this year. Those included leaking A/C units, pest problems including bedbugs, and issues with lighting in common areas. Code noted that most of those complaints are now resolved, and its officers will return July 11 for a follow-up inspection. Meanwhile, residents are banding together to keep the spotlight on conditions.

Good Harbor has yet to respond to a request for comment. - Nina Hernandez

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A Two-Horse Race for Mayor

Can Laura Morrison hope to edge out Steve Adler?

"The Mayor Who Does Stuff" vs. "The Clear Choice"?

That's one way to think about the upcoming mayoral campaign between incumbent Steve Adler and former Council Member Laura Morrison, as reflected in their own current thoughts about the race.

"I think the defining issue is trying actually to do stuff," Adler said in a recent interview. "To be really clear-eyed about the challenges we face, and the need to do things to address those challenges, rather than just hoping they'll go away."

"I've been talking to people all over town," Morrison told the Chronicle. "People are looking for a clear choice. There's a deep concern about the path we are on, and the leadership we have. I think I represent that clear choice."

BREAKING THE CODE

Those are not the most precise selfdescriptions, but they do reflect broad distinctions between the candidates as they look toward November. In his press releases, Adler points to the accomplishments of his first term, with his City Council colleagues, as having made progress not just on local issues - affordability, mobility, homelessness - but on national issues such as immigration, discrimination against the LGBTQ+ community, and climate change. "It's been a Council that's not afraid to wade into pretty choppy and opaque waters."

Morrison's counterargument is less about "doing stuff" than how that stuff is being done. She says the mayor has relied too much on "backroom deals" and "top-down" politics, instead of reaching out to a broad city constituency and finding ways to work "from the bottom up."

Central to that debate is the seemingly endless city project that is CodeNEXT, the years-long revision of Austin's land use code, that has finally arrived at the dais for ongoing discussions and revisions. Adler believes the rewriting process will end in a code that will address many of the city's housing and related problems while allaying concerns of residents who say they fear neighborhood destruction. As the mayor sees it, the headlines about CodeNEXT do not reflect the conversations he's heard around the city about the issue. "I recognize that within certain groups, CodeNEXT is an emotional and fraught issue, because you're dealing with people's homes, and their expectations about the future. ...

"Some people will show me photographs of things they dislike in their neighborhoods - a 'McMansion' or something else, and say 'that's why I hate CodeNEXT.' I can only respond, if you have photographs, CodeNEXT didn't do it ... CodeNEXT hasn't happened yet. And on the other hand, I hear folks saying that those neighborhood people who oppose CodeNEXT are just racist NIMBYs, trying to deny opportunity to people in the city.

"Neither of those things are right, and we have to stop vilifying people who have different views or priorities."

On that subject, Morrison can sound at first surprisingly like the mayor. For every person who describes "development" or "developers" as an unmitigated evil, Morrison says, "There are people on the other side who caricature those worried about their neighborhoods as just 'antigrowth,' or opposing all change. That's not fair, and it's not true."

Where Morrison differs from Adler is

that she lays at least some of the blame for the public polarization at the mayor's feet. "There hasn't been sufficient outreach from City Hall - despite such a long and expensive process - and too many people feel they haven't been consulted. They say they feel like they've been disenfranchised. ... There are a lot of people concerned about Austin's future, about their neighbors having to leave the city because of rising housing costs."

Morrison similarly criticizes the mayor on other high-profile issues - for example, the current controversy over the proposal to establish a Major League Soccer team at McKalla Place. If not for public pressure and dissent at Council, she says, the Precourt/Columbus Crew proposal would have been handled entirely "behind the scenes."

"I think having a professional soccer team would be great. But the process of how we get there should be open and transparent ... and whatever happens on the site, we should give a lot of weight to the neighborhood plan." She said the widely differing appraisals (as high as \$29 million and as low as \$9.6 million, under different conditions) have to "raise some red flags. What's going on in the background? There's just a lot of lack of trust in City Hall."

For his part, Adler defends the city's process in evaluating the MLS proposals, and is also more enthusiastic about the potential benefits. He said he agrees with the "deal points" initially raised by Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo, adding, "There are still too few opportunities in the city where we gather as a community," he said, citing things like the Waller Creek Park nights or the annual kite festival at Zilker Park. "Soccer has the potential to be an element in the city for which everybody comes together ... the same as a museum or a library, bringing a community benefit."

As the campaign heats up over the summer, it remains an open question whether CodeNEXT will be a sufficiently dominating issue to exhaust much of the political oxygen. Adler says City Council will give the code revision discussion and decisions the time they need; Morrison points to Council's vote - currently subject to a court challenge – not to put the "Community Not Commodity" anti-CodeNEXT petition on the November ballot as another betrayal of the public interest. "The mayor and the majority of the council ignored the voices of 32,000 citizens [who had signed the petition]."

Morrison says she's not persuaded by Adler's argument that Council was acting on the available legal advice, that the petition's intent - essentially, to freeze for an extended period any comprehensive code revision - was impermissible under state law. "Legal opinions are always on a spectrum," Morrison said, "and the council needs to respect the voters."

Adler responds, "We acted on the legal advice we had, quickly enough to send the matter to court [via a CNC lawsuit]. If the court comes back with a different answer, we still have time to put it on the ballot."

How that argument plays out over the next couple of months could go a long way to determine the election outcome. If enough voters believe that CodeNEXT (or related land-use decisions) will only serve to transform Austin's urban landscape beyond all recognition and affordability, Morrison would have a strong chance of defeating a popular incumbent enjoying a prosperous economy. On the other hand, if a majority of voters remain persuaded by Adler's persistent refrain - "We can't be afraid of change, because we have to be able to change in order to preserve what's special about this city" he is likely to repeat what incumbent mayors have done over the last three decades, and win re-election. To find a counterexample, you have to reach all the way back to May of 1985, when Frank Cooksey defeated incumbent Ron Mullen in a run-off.

RUNNING THE NUMBERS

In other words, Morrison presumably has an uphill climb. Nevertheless, when she initially announced her run, she emphasized, "I wouldn't be doing this if I didn't believe I can win." Some voters, but not many current Austin residents, are likely to remember Cooksey, Mullen, or even the Austin of 1985, population 417,000. Another version of the race might be represented as the politics of nostalgia - undeniably a potent Austin cultural force – vs. the politics of change, with Morrison amplifying the voices of Old Austin and Adler weighing in on the side of the New. That's oversimplification, but it's worth recalling that both candidates - like a majority of current Austinites - arrived in the city from elsewhere, and at roughly the same time. (Adler, now 62, first came to study law in 1978; Morrison, 63, arrived with her family in 1981.)

Austin's population has more than doubled since 1985 - 926,000 as of 2016 - and there have been other changes that might put a thumb on the electoral scales. The last spring Council election was in May of 2012, when there were 49,336 total ballots cast (Lee Leffingwell garnered 52%: 25,446). By 2014, the election had been moved to November, and there were 209,104 votes cast, with a little over 175,000 working their way to the municipal bottom of the ballot. In the first round. Adler won 37% (64.416), and then defeated Mike Martinez in a December run-off. The run-off turnout - at 15.6% of registered voters, nothing to brag about returned 52,159 Adler voters (67%).

Presumably, the November electorate is not just larger, but more representative of the entire Austin population, and in theory less preoccupied with the provincial issues that often dominate Council discussions. That should favor the mayor, if only because his name and face have been in the local media steadily for the last four years, while Morrison is returning after three years out of the headlines. Longtime political consultant David Butts, a member of Adler's 2014 campaign team, is again supporting the mayor. But he has previously worked for Morrison – and indeed says he tried to persuade her to run in 2014, when (term-limit-

The mayor's race tends to attract a handful of candidates beyond the likely front-runners. The 2014 race, which featured dozens of Council candidates overall, also included four long-shot mayoral hopefuls who as a group garnered 9% of the vote. This year, a couple of long shots have filed early: former solar panel salesman Travis Duncan and pedicab driver Alex Strenger.

Duncan began his campaign with a strong environmentalist message, saying the city was moving far too slowly to end its use of fossil fuels, and should henceforth "cease permitting any fossil fuel infrastructure." He's continued in that vein on his Facebook page and website (www.wearethemayor.com), where he has posted a series of rambling videos endorsing a "new paradigm" to replace the current "corrupt system." He declares that when elected, he would "ban all plastic and petrochemical products," require all new construction to eliminate all fossil fuel infrastructure, "eliminate the cost of electricity by transferring ownership of that infrastructure to the people" (apparently unaware that Austin Energy is in fact a public utility), and so on. Asked how he would impose policies that are currently illegal, he said he would "change the laws."

More recently, Duncan's been promoting something called "Ubuntu Contributionism." a political philosophy popularized by Michael Tellinger, a South African promoter of various conspiracy theories and

author of books claiming that space aliens founded human civilization 200,000 years ago.

Duncan appears relatively earnest if completely uninterested in the actual responsibilities and practice of government. Strenger, by contrast, seems essentially a prankster running his campaign as a joke. He advocates "building a dome" over Austin in order to "kick out the Californians" and prevent more from arriving, and "make Uber pay for it." (Strenger is himself a recent transplant, from New York.) To reduce police shootings, he says he'd replace officers' guns with flamethrowers, as well as providing flamethrowers for self-defense to schoolteachers. As mayor, he would "legalize all street drugs" - marijuana to cocaine - and use the consequent tax revenue to fund the city.

Asked whether voters should take his campaign seriously, Strenger said he is using an "unconventional presentation" to address serious issues such as affordable housing and traffic. "What I'm proposing makes more sense than much of what the city spends its money on. ... These are serious issues, and there is nobody better than me to address them."

At the moment, Duncan and Strenger join Steve Adler and Laura Morrison as the only declared mayoral candidates (that is, they've filed the required campaign treasurer appointments with the Office of the City Clerk). Note: Aug. 20 is the final filing date to get a name on the Nov. 6 ballot.

ed as a council member) she considered the possibility but ultimately decided against it.

Butts acknowledged that a lot of things can happen between now and election day, but at the moment he thinks Adler "would be overwhelmingly ahead right now." Morrison's last competitive race was in 2008, when she fairly easily defeated Cid Galindo; she was re-elected in 2011 with 73% of the vote (amid an execrable 7.4% turnout). Butts thinks perhaps the first 50,000 voters will consider CodeNEXT a primary concern (for better or worse), among 200,000 to 250,000 voters overall. But

Both campaigns are clearly aware of that factor. Although the race is still fairly sleepy, with few public events, the mayor and Morrison have each held "Women for ..." fundraising events in the last few weeks. In terms of listed supporters, Adler edged out the challenger, with a lengthier roster bearing heftier political résumés. Among the Adler host committee for his Mercury Hall soiree on June 3 were: Wilhelmina Delco, Wendy Davis, Rep. Celia Israel, Sheriff Sally Hernandez, Rep. Donna Howard, District Attorney Margaret Moore, and plenty more. Morrison's event,

before that happens, he suggests, Council might well "iron out a lot of the peculiarities" of the code rewrite, blunting it as a polarizing campaign issue.

A different factor, one that could well favor Morrison, is an anticipated anti-Trump "blue wave," along with a spike in younger voters, including many more Democratic women. "She will generate some support because of that," Butts said. "It might not hit Adler hard, but it will have some effect." In her initial campaign announcement, Morrison emphasized that she would be the second woman to be elected Austin mayor. (The first, Carole Keeton - then Carole Keeton McClellan - was Mullen's two-term predecessor, 1977-83.)

a couple of weeks later at Chez Zee, featured a shorter host list and not quite as many Democratic heavyweights: Constable Maria Canchola, former Council Member Beverly Griffith, Rep. Gina Hinojosa, AISD Trustee Ann Teich, and former County Commissioner Karen Huber.

On either side, it's a very small sample, and in any case high-profile endorsements do not inevitably lead to electoral victories. Recall that when Andy Brown kicked off his 2014 campaign for Travis County Judge, establishment Democrats in daunting numbers quickly lined up behind him ... and Sarah Eckhardt proceeded to defeat him easily in the primary.

One other factor - the money race - we'll know much more about in a couple of weeks. The first fundraising period closed June 30, but the numbers won't be posted by the city clerk until Monday, July 16. Thus far, Morrison's visible campaign has been fairly threadbare, so that filing should give a better indication of her competitive financial strength. We already know that Adler - who can lean heavily on his personal wealth, and overwhelmingly outspent Martinez in 2014 - will have a more than adequate kitty. His most recent finance report, dated Jan. 15 (with minor corrections posted June 20), reflected \$236,000 on hand as of the end of last year. The campaign has certainly been both spending and raising since then - and the mayor's campaign will not wilt for lack of funding.

WHO'S THE ESTABLISHMENT?

At this stage, the campaign is quietly civil, and it might well remain that way, since the lion's share of votes for either candidate will come from Westside precincts where both candidates reside and the political air is generally earnest but mild. (And those folks vote: largely Westside districts 6, 7, 8, and 10 produced just under half of the 2014 mayoral tally; Eastside districts 1 through 4, by contrast, accounted for less than 25%.) The candidates' prominent supporters are themselves polite as well. Rep. Hinojosa said her support of Morrison is not "anti-Adler," but based on her experience of Morrison as a "stand-up leader." She cited Morrison's Council work supporting Austin Interfaith's living-wage campaign and her commitment to help Capital IDEA in funding job training. "When the votes weren't there on Council," Hinojosa said, "she used funds from her own office account. She also led the charge to use city money to fund afterschool programs for AISD, and take some pressure off the school budget and property taxes.

"I gave her my support because I believe in her."

Another member of the Central Texas delegation, Rep. Donna Howard, is supporting Adler. She says that while she has "admiration" for Morrison, she "doesn't see a reason for a change" in the mayor's office.

"I'm pleased with the mayor," Howard said, noting the good working relationship the delegation has with Adler and indeed with nearly the whole City Council. "Just one of the things I would point to," she continued, is Adler's advocacy for public school funding, which is not only crucial for Texas children but - via the state's property tax recapture policy - greatly burdens local priorities. As a legislative aide to former Sen. Eliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso, Adler developed an expertise on school funding, and Howard says "he's taken the time to understand the situation, is able to articulate the real issues, and actually understands the subject. And he's willing to come up with out-of-the-box solutions." Howard cites Adler's attempt, last year, to design a property tax "swap" that would raise city rates (not subject to recapture) in order to allow AISD to reduce its rates correspondingly. The proposal proved unwieldy, largely because there are half a dozen other Austin-area school districts, but Howard applauds the effort. "It didn't work out, but he was willing to try to do something differently."

former County Bvcontrast. Commissioner Huber says she likes Adler, but agrees with Morrison - "I just think he's gotten too cozy with real estate developers." Huber doesn't live within city limits, "but I have plenty of former constituents who do, and I'm concerned about how growth affects the whole region. We need to grow realistically, and I would rather have Laura driving that train. ... She has a longterm vision, but is realistic, and she knows how best to make it happen."

Ann Howard, executive director of the Ending Community Homelessness Coalition, has worked closely with both candidates, so to a degree has to thread the needle - but is publicly supporting Adler. Morrison serves on the ECHO board, while Adler "has been a huge champion for us." Howard cites the mayor's work on the successful "ending veteran homelessness"

campaign (begun under Mayor Leffingwell), which she says effectively initiated a broader effort against homelessness. "He opened his Rolodex and connected us with people all over the city," Howard says. "It jumpstarted our ability to engage more people under the tent.

"We can't afford to lose Mayor Adler."

It's worth noting that both candidates support a major affordable housing bond -Council voted last week to approve \$250 million for housing - and that their differences on issues like these tend to be in the process details. Says Morrison, "We all [mayor and Council] tend to agree ... on the broad social justice issues. But in the process of making decisions - we always need to ask, is it a fair decision for the community, or is it a giveaway?"

Longtime local political observer (and former Chronicle reporter) Mike Clark-Madison - still a fairly skeptical pundit says he "can't say he has a strong preference" in the race, but that it seems likely to become "a big battle between the Central Austin neighborhood people and everyone else," with Morrison the voice of those central city, mostly single-family neighborhoods. "It reminds me of the early Nineties, when the 'Green Council' [of environmentalist candidates] overthrew the old guard. Those were the people fighting the establishment back then; they are the establishment now

"On the other hand, Adler is a perfectly good mayor for a city going through so many convulsions right now, but doesn't really know what it wants. He's also the person who explains progressive politics to the people who have money. I don't see that Morrison has a citywide following ... her base is really those Westside and central city neighborhoods.

'She has a shot, but not an ironclad shot." Adler reiterates that as a city, Austin "needs to keep doing stuff." He explicates that to mean - since we have no single magic programs that can at a stroke resolve big problems like affordability or traffic or sustainability (and the Legislature reflexively acts to undermine the city's solutions) - "we need to use all the tools we do have, in as many ways as we can." Counters Morrison, "When solutions come from the top down, or without transparency, or driven by special interests ... it weakens the tools we do have." Expect to hear that difference in perspective, and the political argument it reflects, from now until November 6.

Last weekend, eight Austin Chronicle staffers did something dangerous. As our informed and faithful guide Seena Ounsinegad put it, we formed "a group of privately trained investigators" to follow up on a tip that "Panic City's subway system is home to a deeper and darker underbelly, namely that it's home to a number of notorious crime gangs."

OK, so maybe (definitely) this was the description for the hi-tech "End of the Line" escape room at Project Panic - the four-years-running Austin Panic Room's new offshoot at Guadalupe and 44th - and our guide was an employee. Still, the Chron crew (with "Snapshot" as documentarian) dutifully dove into this local puzzler inspired by crime pop culture to celebrate the kickoff of our July Crime Month (austinchronicle.com/crime-month).

We were immediately boggled by crisscrossing clues upon entering the station, which co-owner Robert Ma savs was inspired by a scene in 2012's The Amazing Spider-Man where Peter Parker uncovers a secret subway criminal hideout: "He had to solve all these clues in order to get the subway car to come up," said Ma in a post-Panic chat.

We tried everything, like calling numbers on this pay phone ...



... until we made it onto the subway car, which was boobytrapped to propel us toward a fiery crash. Only uncovering more clues could save us: "It's detective work how I imagine it to be," said Ma, who worked on the room with local engineers and prop/set designers.

"You piece things together and use some kind of imagination or deduction to get out ... so it's similar to










elen Currie Foster. Noreen Cedeño. Kathy Waller. They're sisters in crime, and they write - and read - and are generally fascinated by - the unnerving variety of evil that humans do.

They're part of the local chapter - the Heart of Texas chapter - of the Sisters in Crime writers' network, a national organization founded in 1987 by author Sara Paretsky of V.I. Warshawski fame. (It's Sisters in Crime, yes, but brothers are also welcome among those "bound by their affection for the mystery genre and the support of women who write mysteries.") Foster is the current president of Austin's chapter, Cedeño vice president, and Waller the web editor. They're sitting with your reporter at a local coffeehouse to talk about what their outpost of SinC, begun in 1994 and as lively as ever, has to offer. And to divulge why they're so into narratives of our species' dark side in the first place.

"Part of it is, we like to understand why these bad things happen," says Foster, author of the Alice MacDonald Greer series of books relating the Texas-flavored sleuthing adventures of a "feisty Texas lawyer." "We want to know why people do these things. And then there's always the desire to solve a puzzle. You know, some of the classic English mysteries are very puzzleoriented, where you have to figure out the clever mechanism. But I think there's more to it than that, these days, and the interest is much broader, more global. When Noreen writes, she gets into the paranormal"

"There's so much you can do with mystery," says Cedeño, nodding in agreement, "mixing it with other genres - with science fiction or fantasy." Cedeño's The Walls Can Talk, for instance, features a sort of ghostbusting detective crew called Bad Vibes

Murders, They Write

Austin's Sisters in Crime prefer their ink mixed with a little blood

Removal Services. "I like to look at why people commit crime," she says. "What would make someone do this or that, what would make them *murder* somebody. That should be of interest to anybody: understanding why someone would break such a primary social rule."

That's one of a writer's chores and joys, of course: investigating a character's interiority, whether that character is scrupulously law-abiding or a murderer, an embezzler, a rapist, a violent psychopath, a jaywalker. erly side of how to publish a book, how to launch a book, and all of that is very good for the business side. So we try to have topics that cover both. We had a meeting that featured a talk by a Texas Ranger, and that was fantastic. He talked about their efforts to reduce human trafficking and to find people who are being trafficked - on what to look for, how to identify a person who's being trafficked. And the details that went into that were just mind-blowing."

"I like to look at why people commit crime," Cedeño says. "What would make someone do this or that. what would make them *murder* somebody. That should be of interest to anybody: understanding why someone would break such a primary social rule."

But, especially in the case of criminals (and their putative opponents, the police or citizen gumshoes), there are a lot of practical matters that need to be addressed. Shadowy practical matters, that need to be properly, realistically depicted. And access to that information, up close and personal, is one of the perks of SinC membership.

"About two years ago, we decided we needed some toolbox kind of programs," says Foster. "Something to explore what really goes on that we don't know about."

"There's two levels for that," says Cedeño. "There's the general information about how crimes are committed, and then the writ-

"In March," says Foster, "we had Ed Martin, who is a mild-mannered, charming CPA for the IRS - who ultimately tracked down the murderers of Madalyn Murray O'Hair and her family, and got the killers to share the information and even draw him a map to the burial site."

"What fascinated me about that talk," says Waller, whose short stories are featured in the Murder on Wheels anthology from Austin Mystery Writers, "was when Martin finally got to the man who would give him the whole story, the guy said, 'Look, I don't talk to law enforcement.' And Martin said, 'Hey, I'm IRS, you can talk to me.' And the guy spilled it."

"That story," says Foster, "there are so many details that are stranger than fiction."

"Exactly," agrees Cedeño. "If you tried to write something like that, no one would believe it."

The point with fiction is, of course, to write things that people do believe, that at the very least allow for an easy suspension of disbelief. And Sisters in Crime is primarily a writers' organization, after all, so you can likely deduce the tenor of many speaker-enhanced meetings.

"Yes," says Foster, "in addition to learning about the business of writing, we also have speakers on the art of writing. We had Michael Noll from the Writers' League of Texas - he wrote The Writer's Field Guide to the Craft of Fiction - and he had us do some voice and description exercises. His first question was, 'How many of you like to do writing exercises?' And the whole room just hissed." Her sudden laughter rings like pleasant chimes in the coffeehouse backyard. "But it's helpful," she continues, "because writing is a lonely occupation. And so for someone to come in and jog your habits a little bit, or bring new insights, it's a really helpful thing. One of my favorite meetings was last November, when everyone who was working on something got to read whatever it was - for five minutes. So you hear different voices and you learn something about the people you've been sitting next to in meetings."

"It's good to know what your friends are working on," says Cedeño, "to get a taste of how everybody else writes."

And that sort of taste, and the speakers that enhance it, are what's provided by the Heart of Texas chapter's monthly meetings - which take place at Cafe Express on the second Sunday of each month and are attended by 20 or so of the chapter's current members. And, nota bene, those meetings are open to the public.

"We're not a group for published writers exclusively," Waller points out. "We have writers who are published and writers who are unpublished."

So we'd tell you about the meetings, anyway, in case of your general interest; but, personally, we're glad to note that the SinC guest speaker on Sunday, July 8, will be Dr. David Ciambrone, retired scientist, chemist, forensics consultant, and author of Poisons: The Handbook for Writers, who will be telling the gathered all about the chemical means of bringing death to those who, depending on whose narrative you empower, may or may not deserve it.





Certain Uncertainty

In Zach Theatre's *Heisenberg*, we observe the unlikely pairing of two people as an experiment in risk and change

It's unusual, I imagine, for a theatre review to begin with an explanation of Heisenberg's Uncertainty Principle; nevertheless, here we are. In a very dim nutshell, German scientist Werner Heisenberg determined that an act as seemingly innocuous as observation still comes with a tangible force capable of affecting the behavior of quantum particles, though in what way it's impossible to predict. It's related to the Observer Effect and the "Copenhagen Interpretation" of quantum physics - but Observer isn't really an interesting play title, and, well, Michael Frayn already wrote Copenhagen.

In Simon Stephens' Heisenberg, currently at Zach's Kleberg Stage, a case could be made that we, the audience, are the observers, and the two characters a force unto each other. Uncertainty certainly reigns in this well-written, precisely directed, and superbly performed piece. It's a loose connection

between title and subject, sure, and the scientist's name is never spoken, but as we watch a charming and unlikely May-December romance blossom in the strangest of ways, we're left to assume the cat is both alive and dead until we reach a definite conclusion (wait ... dammit, that's Schrödinger).

We begin moments after Georgie plants a smooch on the back of Alex's neck in a London train station, thinking he was someone else, and the apologetic frenzy that ensues. The unlikely (or is it?) relationship progresses rather quickly, their contrasting personalities challenging each other in compelling ways. Georgie is a curious woman: direct, aggressive, frantically kinetic, and a bit vulgar - perhaps characteristics an English playwright might ascribe to all American women? This could easily be problematic, but Liz Beckham expertly navigates the charac-

ter with incredible skill and authenticity; her Georgie seems almost like a reformed "manic pixie dream girl" with whom life has had its unkind way and has learned more than her share of hard lessons by her early 40s. Harvey Guion's Alex is the direct opposite: reserved and concise, if not a bit withdrawn. Alex is a 75-year-old butcher, and Guion treats the character with deserved patience; the result is as charming as it is entertaining.

This is one of those "too many details spoil the plot" type of shows, so I won't let any cats out of their bags (or boxes). Suffice to say, it's not your typical rom-com. It's not even typical fare for Zach Theatre, in my experience; produced in the round with minimal design, this two-hander stands in stark contrast to such large-scale Zach offerings as, say, Sunday in the Park With George or Disney's Beauty and the Beast.

The set by designer Scott Groh is just two chairs and one table on a bare stage, with Guion and Beckham acting as stagehands as well. Craig Brock's sound is lovely, providing distraction during scene changes and environmental ambience. The costumes by Blair Hurry are modern-day, which costumers around the world know can often be as difficult as anything. Rachel Atkinson's lights are simple but effective. Amanda Cooley Davis provides dialect coaching, and here's the one place things get murky. It's hard to place Guion's accent, which seems to slip between RP English and Irish, sometimes both, and sometimes neither. We do learn roughly onethird through the play that Alex was born in Ireland and came to London at 11, so it's possible they were going for a hybrid, but it's not quite spot-on and is the one part of the show I found distracting – though only just.

Director Nat Miller does a remarkable job bringing the story to the forefront and allowing the actors to shine, while not forgoing design, just keeping it artistically simple and elegant. Heisenberg is a show about risk and change, really, and the "uncertainty" that comes with actively taking those risks, without a clue what life will yield as a result.

Observe for yourself. I think it's worth it.

"WE'LL JUST ROCK FOR OURSELVES: SELECTIONS FROM THE LISA DAVIS ARCHIVE"

Austin History Center, 810 Guadalupe library.austintexas.gov/ahc **Through July 22**

An archive is an accumulation of records over a lifetime, extensions of memory that bring communities together. "We'll Just Rock for Ourselves: Selections From the Lisa Davis Archive" aims to elucidate the life and work of the late local photographer who sought to chronicle the underground scenes often left unrecorded.

Culled from an archive of more than 29,000 images, Davis' photography on display pivots around Austin's lesbian musicians and LGBTQ activists of the Nineties. Davis captured countless bands, queer and otherwise, but it was the city's "lezzie rock" groups such as Two Nice Girls, Power Snatch, and Sincola – with their sexually and politically charged music from a queer, feminist perspective – that proved enthralling for Davis.

The Austin History Center exhibit's energy resides in Davis' images of these bands performing live, in the recording studio, or posing for photo/video shoots - commanding subjects that always occupy the entire frame. About a dozen photographs line the walls. Mostly undated, the concert photos are shot in color, with hues of cranberry (a bass guitar and drum set) and some pink (frilled, babydoll lingerie) running between them. In contrast, the recording studio photos are shot in black and white.

By rendering the performances in color, Davis captures the kineticism inherent to live music, while the monochrome of the recording subjects suggests a shade of intellectual gravitas absent from the stage. Their songs may have had titles like Two Nice Girls' "I Spent My Last \$10 (on Birth Control and Beer)," but these rock bands operated from a fully formed political consciousness - an activist ethos that Davis understood, as the program and two photos from the 1993 March on Washington tell us.



The statement piece Darcee Douglas playing with Power Snatch hangs above the room's fireplace. (After all, the center occupies what was once Austin's Central Library, originally built in the Thirties with an Italian Renaissance style. The punk-meets-ornate clash doesn't go unnoticed, but it doesn't distract either.) Shot from the front row, with Davis gazing up at Douglas, the image captures the musician looking back and reaching her right hand toward the camera, her palm absorbing most of the flash. The neck of Douglas' bass guitar draws attention to a woman in the background, though the focus isn't sharp enough to reveal her exact role onstage. But that doesn't matter. Douglas'

outstretched, glowing hand - whether read as a stop sign or an invitation - entices the viewer to step onto this stage.

Along with photography comes a biography encapsulated. A glass case, featuring Davis' press ID cards, DIY 30th birthday party invitation, and CV, among other personal effects, illuminates the photographer's prolific yet brief life behind the lens. In 1995, when she was 32 years old, Davis took her life, disclosed through her "Memorial Service brochure" on display. Hanging above the case is the original sign (emblazoned with its namesake in black cursive) from Chances, a popular lesbian bar and punk performance spot in the Eighties and Nineties frequented by Davis and her friends-cum-subjects. As a whole, then, the exhibit operates as something close to an informative though wholly engaging eulogy.

At the Austin History Center, Davis' work is contextualized within a historical framework, which reveals the magnitude of her legacy today. Situated in a corner is a player with a reel of videos featuring concerts, music videos, and studio sessions of bands depicted in the exhibit. For an activist-artist, breaking the gallery's serenity with a few minutes of punk rock seems more than fitting. - Beth Sullivan



AUTHOR OF PLEASARTERIZE

Anyone who's spent any time in the East Texas Piney Woods can tell you that the shadows there are dark and deep - so dark and deep that something hidden in them may never come to light. That's the country into which Darren Mathews drives in Attica Locke's Bluebird, Bluebird, and though this Texas Ranger knows the landscape, he almost loses himself in those shadows while trying to solve a double homicide in Lark, a bump in the road on Highway 59 northeast of Nacogdoches. That the victims were a black man and a white woman - the former a Chicago lawyer, the latter a local waitress - goes a long way toward explaining why the killings set the town on edge. Racial tensions run as high in Lark today as they did a century ago, the only change being that the white supremacists have switched from the KKK to the ABT – the Aryan

Those tensions just make Mathews' job that much more complicated. For while Locke casts him from the mold of

the classic mystery hero - troubled marriage, check; drinking problem, check; obstinate sense of honor, check; suspended by superiors, check; disobeys their orders anyway, check she gives him one crucial difference: He's black. As a member of the Texas Rangers, that makes him a rarity. And as a lawman investigating the murder of a black man in Deep East Texas, that puts a target on his back. He isn't the enemy just for the secrets he may uncover; he's the enemy for the color of his skin.

A native Texan herself, Locke knows how such racial animus can breed an atmosphere of dread, and she employs it deftly to spark suspense - every shadow seems to conceal a threat, and Mathews' audacious visits to the icehouse

favored by the ABT feel like a walk into the lion's den. But Locke also knows that there's more to East Texas than conflict. For every fraught moment that has you turning the page, there's a personal moment with the characters where the culture and history Locke dishes up has you linger on the page, to sop up every detail like red-eye gravy with a biscuit - loving descriptions of ramshackle roadside cafes and the strong black women who run them, of fresh homemade fried pies, of Lightnin' Hopkins wailing from the jukebox, of a love so strong that it could make a man who was "a Devil on the Guitar" give up the road to be with his woman, of a will so strong that black families wouldn't let anyone push them off the land they made their own. Locke

> gets the red dirt of East Texas under our nails as she pushes deeper into the novel's mystery, and with it we gain a greater understanding of not just the region but also the relationships in it and how tangled they can be. Black and

white don't mix only in death.

BLUEBIRD. BLUEBIRD

This is a world in which the modest, low-slung cafe of Geneva Sweet, a black woman who has run it for decades, sits on one side of the road, and directly across from it sits a sprawling red-brick mansion designed to resemble Monticello, whose white owner, Wallace Jefferson III, also happens to own the icehouse frequented by the Aryan Brotherhood. Wally has no problem with whites who terrorize and murder blacks, and yet he can be very solicitous and even protective of Geneva. Something has been hidden in the shadows of the Piney Woods, and as a black Texas Ranger works to pull it into the light, Highway 59 proves to be a thin line between love and hate. - Robert Faires

"Titanic: The Artifact Exhibition" at the Mayborn Museum in Waco unlocks some of the mysteries of what was once the largest and most opulent cruise ship in the world.

On April 15, 1912, the ocean liner became the most storied ship short of Noah's Ark.

Explorers discovered the "unsinkable" vessel 73 years after it dropped nearly 2.5 miles below the frigid surface. The structure lay nearly 13 miles from where it had reportedly gone down. The stern and bow came to rest nearly half a mile apart.

RMS Titanic Inc. secured exclusive rights to research the wreckage. In eight expeditions the company recovered over 5,500 items from the large debris field. More than 150 of the artifacts are on display at the Mayborn Museum.

Of those aboard, 1,523 were lost and 705 were rescued. As visitors enter the exhibit they are given a "boarding pass" of one of the passengers on the ship.

The voyage through the exhibition begins at the construction of the vessel and continues through displays of the cabins, pieces of the ship, as well as table settings and dinner menus. Along the way are stories and possessions of billionaires, immigrants, and other passengers.

After viewing the detritus from the shattered ship, visitors take out their boarding passes at the end of the exhibit to find the name of "their" passenger on a list to see if they survived that fateful day.

"Titanic: The Artifact Exhibition" is at the Mayborn Museum in Waco through Jan. 6, 2019. The show is one of nine artifact



exhibits including permanent displays in Las Vegas, Nev., and Orlando, Fla. Timed tickets are available at www.maybornmuseum.com.

And Then There Were Eight

The round of 16 provided a couple of great games, a new teenage star, lots of goals, and the biggest upset in World Cup history; let's hope the quarterfinals live up to that standard. One side of the bracket (the teams playing Friday) has four teams who are legitimate threats to win it all; the other side (playing Saturday) has ... well, one team who's going to be in the final.

Quarterfinals

FRI., JULY 6

9am: France-Uruguay (FS1) France sparkled in knocking out Leo Messi and Argentina, even though they did give up three goals. Kylian Mbeppe became the first teenager since Pele to score two goals in a game, and he set up a third by blasting through the entire Argentine defense on an amazing 60-yard run before being pulled down from behind to draw a penalty. This kid's for real, but so is Uruguay, who finally allowed their first goal of the tournament, but pretty solidly dominated a pretty good Portugal team.

1pm: Brazil-Belgium (FS1) This probably ought to be the final: They're ranked two-three in the world (after Germany), and the best-looking teams in the tournament so far. Brazil, especially, looked like the total package in stifling a good Mexican attack early, then showing off their own attacking flair in a 2-0 win that could've been worse but for all-world goalie Memo Ochoa. Belgium, meanwhile, came back from a shock 2-0 deficit to Japan,

and scored what is surely the goal of the tournament: a shocker with eight seconds left in extra time that swept the length of the field in the 12 seconds after Belgian goalie Thibaut Courtois caught a Japanese free kick. Five perfect, difficult, smart plays in a row, from five different players - that is what we watch the game for.

SAT., JULY 7 9am: Sweden-England (Fox)

Sweden was never expected to be here, but they've added some sharp counter-attacking combinations to their organized defense, and could be a handful for anybody. And that "anybody" will be England, as it happens, who

reversed a longtime hex and phobia by squeezing past Colombia in penalty kicks. The young English squad looked great at times, but gassed at the end; they'll need to be sharp to break down the Swedes.

1pm: Croatia-Russia (Fox)

Russia's upset of Spain has left the bottom half of the bracket wide open. Unless Uncle Vladimir somehow has the fix in, I still don't believe in this team, but their bunkering totally frustrated Spain, who set a record for completed passes (1,114), but had no real attacking ideas, and became the only group winners to be knocked out in the first round. Croatia - a darkhorse favorite but not too convincing in a PK win over Denmark - will have to do better.





Restaurant Review: Suerte

I FELL IN LOVE WITH A CUP OF HOT CORN by Jessi Cape

It's rare in this gig, especially in this town, to eat something so delicious that one bite overshadows all other food, and it's even more rare when it's a corn-based appetizer. The sweet corn esquites con fontina at Suerte was that something for me. (It also inspired a self-imposed moratorium on eating anything but that dish, ad infinitum, but for obvious reasons I relented.) Their twist on Mexican street corn salad, or off-the-cob elotes, is

served piping hot in a customblown glass filled with grilled sweet corn, foamed fontina cheese, pulpy lime bits, and crispy heirloom corn tortillas crafted from house-made masa. This dish embodies the way a three-month-old restaurant on East Sixth street is mastering

the art of elevated simplicity. Suerte has a thing for corn, and apparently, so do I.

When owner Sam Hellmann-Mass, a founding partner of Barley Swine and Odd Duck with a deep love for Oaxaca, struck out solo, he had his sights set. Suerte is dedicated to honoring Oaxacan cuisine, one full of ancient preparations, while utilizing the bounty of Central Texas ingredients and serving it all in a modern Austin space. He brought on executive chef Fermín Núñez (formerly of Uchiko, L'oca d'oro, and Launderette), who grew up in Torreón, in north-central Mexico, and South Texas, to design a menu with that vision in mind. The balance between earthy masa-laden

dishes and fresh raw offerings makes a perfect meal when they're allowed to work in tandem. Basically, be sure to order from every section of the menu.

The space, formerly the restaurant Dario's, which closed in 2014, is lovely and bright and filled with curated treasures from Hellmann-Mass' travels through Mexico. Local artist Aaron Michalovic designed the huge vibrant custom front door (which boasts a very cool

locally made and one-of-a-kind lock), and a simple statement on the adjacent window catches your eye as you walk in: "No guns, Be cool, Have fun." Old Mexican cookbooks (plus one Jeff Smith Frugal Gourmet bonus book) adorn the host stand, and the kitchen opens

to the left, with enough visual to intrigue, but not distract. The large room is decorated with light-colored wood and handwoven pale pink and gray patterned textiles from a street artist Hellmann-Mass met in Oaxaca, and it balances fairly communal seating with standard two- and four-tops. A line of woven light fixtures counter the bold steel-framed art lighting made from upcycled mezcal jugs in the corner, and fresh flowers are everywhere. The wall of brick is the only structural reminder of the former space, and the new huge windows open up (once the summer sauna has passed). The long bar has (very) heavy wooden and steel stools, and above,

in a series of shelves, sit time-honored tools and a few simple tchotchkes. (Check out the bathrooms for a burst of color and trippy wallpaper excitement.)

Aesthetically, it's an absolutely beautiful restaurant. The only hiccup in Suerte's dining room is the deafening sound of a Friday night full house. Complimentary valet service eased the parking woes, and I was thrilled to find out the place was packed but that there was no wait, but intimate conversation had to wait. Still, the service - and this is something I cannot reiterate enough - was impeccable on both of my visits. Really: Those servers and bartenders are some of the best in the city. The drink program is mezcal-heavy, but also features corn whiskey, local sotol and tequila and beers – including a custom Hops & Grain brew. The Federale, a twist on an Old Fashioned, was boozy and settled my dining companion's nerves, while my rose water and mezcal Rosalinda did the same for me. The menu changes often, sometimes just an ingredient or two, and that night's ceviche was striped bass served in green tomato broth with cucumbers and chile arbol. I certainly wished for more of that bright and tangy goodness, but such is the case with really great small plates.

Back to the corn. Suerte sources heirloom white and Bloody Butcher corn from Barton Springs Mill, and the kitchen, under the guidance of Núñez, processes the corn. It goes through nixtamalization, where the corn is soaked and cooked in an alkaline solution, then the altered-state corn is hulled and ground into dough with a molino to make masa - the staple of tostadas, tamales, tlacovos, tlavudas, and of course, tortillas, Just as in Oaxacan fare, it's the backbone of Suerte's menu. Or maybe it's a musician who excels in the use of restraint because they're just really that good. (I'm talking about the 2002 live version of "Perfect Day" with Lou Reed and Luciano Pavarotti at a benefit for Angola. If you haven't seen it, get thee to YouTube.) My favorite dishes with the star of the show were the beet tostada with

smashed avocado, peanut walnut yum yum sauce, and pickled onions, and the current taco special, the suadero tacos with tender confit brisket, black magic oil, and avocado salsa cruda. A glutton for punishment, we also ordered the mole carrots and the goat barbacoa, served with ramekins of charred shishito salsa, queso fresco, sungold pico, and escabeche-style green bean bits. I had to be rolled out of the restaurant, making my wish for more food completely laughable. We ate that goat for two more days.

My next visit was during happy hour on a Wednesday, so now we can talk about that corn again. Lucky Hour runs 5-6pm every day, and initially I thought, "Who has a one-hour happy hour?" but after tasting that Don Dario margarita, only \$6 in this window, I realized it's really for our benefit. Not only does it just look cool, in one of those heavy-bottomed custom glasses that's just as artsy as it is functional, the blanco tequila pairs perfectly with tamarindo, sarsaparilla, and lime, and really kicks your afternoon into high gear. It's a casual vibe at that hour, but the service was still warm and exactly on-point. At one point, my cloth napkin fell and before I could hop down from my, again, really heavy barstool, it was already scooped up and replaced. Toward the end of the hour, the dinner-diners arrived, and that vocal volume went to eleven. Regardless, the "snackcidents" are \$5 - including that show-stopping cup of corn. The only dish I felt like I wouldn't date again was the aguachiles, royal red prawns in a cascabel chili broth with tostadas, largely due to the blandness of the flesh, but other breakout performances like the chicken tamal and the duck egg flan really sold me. (Personal bonus: Pineapple, my Kryptonite, will never appear on the menu because it doesn't grow in Central Texas.)

Overall, is Suerte pricey? Yes, it is, save for that magical six-finger discount hour, but I'd highly suggest paying this place a visit. Just a perfect day: Drink Don Darios and eat corn at the bar, and then later, when it gets dark, we go home.

Dining, Driving, and Dealing on the Vegan Food Chain

AND WHERE TO FIND THE BEST TUNA SANDWICH (SANS TUNA)

There are dozens of dedicated spots to find plant-based burgers, milkshakes, and tacos, but local vegans are no strangers to the disappointment of finding out their favorite food truck ran out of dairy-free cheese two days ago and won't have any more in stock until next Tuesday. It all goes back to the complicated chain of food distribution.

Isaac Mogannam, co-owner of PLOW Burger and now **PLOW Distribution**, knows firsthand that getting quality plant-based foods to the masses is no easy task. Mogannam likens vegan food distribution to a cross between gambling and drug dealing: It's equal parts crossing your fingers as you lay money on the table and dealing with unreliable suppliers hawking overpriced goods.

Conventional restaurants (as in not vegan) don't often offer much in the way of vegan condiments like dairy-free cheese and eggless mayo, or meatless substitutes like seitan and tempeh, simply because the big-box distributors don't offer many plant-based choices. And even when they do, those

specialty ingredients often aren't available in the small quantities required by the food purveyors. That means long waits for much-needed products, the risk of spoilage from overordering, and the threat of standing in line at Whole Foods to stock up on vegan ranch and dairy-free buns at retail prices.

Mogannam figures if plant-based foods were easier for restaurateurs and chefs to get their hands on, they'd likely want to offer more options for the growing vegan community. The key is accessibility. "It needs to be easy for conventional places to get their hands on this stuff and easy for them to execute," he said. "How else are you going to get conventional restaurants to offer it?"

His solution was to become the distributor he'd dreamed of all along. Mogannam started small for his distribution product list, with plant-based mayo, cheese, and bacon because he was already bringing them in for PLOW Burger. Then Bouldin Creek reached out to see if he could help them get their hands on a few items, and that parlayed into a growing client list and even more plant-based products. Not only does he help restaurants order those specialty ingredients, he explains their market value, demonstrates how to cook and prep the ingredients, and offers advice on designing new plant-based menu items. Mogannam also hopes to show wholesale customers how they can increase sales by appealing to an additional, and rapidly growing, dining demographic.

Currently PLOW offers items such as boxed water, vegan drumsticks, shrimp, caviar, and fish-free sushi at storefronts like Rabbit Food Grocery and Thai Vegan in San Antonio. They've also perfected the tunaless salad that even many omnivores have been raving about. Aptly named, the Best Vegan Tuna Sandwich is currently available at Rabbit Food Grocery, the Bee Grocery, Buzz Mill, and the Flag Store at 45th and Duval.

Mogannam doesn't just want to be a plant-based food distributor, he wants to be a specialty plant-based food distributor, offering surprising items that are hard to find. He's applying the same principle to the distribution company as he does to the food trailer: "Good food should just be good food. If it happens to come from plants, that's even better."

Third Time's the Charm

DAN SIEGELSTEIN'S COMEDY PEOPLE WITH ISSUES TAKES THE LONG PATH by Richard Whittaker

Austin comedy *People With Issues* was always meant to be a film. But in the last five years, it's been an award-winning short, and a web series, before it arrived on home release last month in its original, as-intended feature form. Writer-director Dan Siegelstein said, "The thing that kept me going was a very, very stubborn can-do attitude."

It's the story of three immediately identifiable Austin twentysomethings – lovelorn librarian Jack (Tanner Kalina), underachieving receptionist Aaron (Adam Mengesha), and conflicted cartoonist Darren (Dano Colón) – sat at the bottom of a drained swimming pool, asking themselves, "Well, how did I get here?" Aside from one shot of the Downtown skyline, there's no real blinding signposts that *People With Issues* was shot in Austin, and that was a deliberate decision about showing the realities of life here (hint: no one goes to the Capitol unless they have to). In his day job as a grip,

Siegelstein said he worked on plenty of films where shooting schedules read like a tourism guide. But like many Austinites post-graduation, his slackers are too old to hang out on the Drag, and can't be bothered with the parking on South Congress. Siegelstein said, "I remember when I was at UT, it was all about getting drunk on Sixth Street, but barely a year out of college, I was going, 'Gah, Sixth Street's kind of lame, what else is there?'"

Siegelstein originally wrote the script as a low-budget rom-com ("\$50,000 isn't a lot to make a movie," he said) but when your low budget would still buy a sports car, that's a big ask. First, he made a proof-of-concept short in 2013, with Mengesha, Colón, and J.M. Specht as Jack, and shot it like a TV sitcom before the first commercial break. "That invites people to ask what happens next, and we would use that as a lure to go, 'Funny you should ask; give us 80 grand and you find out."

Sadly, an award-winning festival run still didn't produce enough investors, so in 2014 Siegelstein raised \$11,000 via Indiegogo, put Kalina in the role of Jack, and rewrote Act I of the film script as an eight-episode

web series. Then Kalina got cast in Richard Linklater's Everybody Wants Some!!, and Siegelstein could leverage his actor's new profile to get new backers to shoot "what we referred to as season 2." In fact, that was really the rest of the film script, "and then we played with it,

and rejigged it in the editing room."

That meant converting five years of shoots into one narrative, with a cast that changed over time (two actors – Kalina and Josephine McAdam, who plays Aaron's

co-worker and frenemy Amber – had even moved to Los Angeles). Some scenes were completely re-edited, to account for the differences between film and web storytelling, and Siegelstein built a new structure.

Separate to the intersecting stories of the three leads, he broke the narrative into three timelines – "The present, set in the party; the flashback in color; and then the flash sideways, in black

and white." Those monochrome sequences were fully repurposed from the web series, and Siegelstein used them to highlight the leads' good-natured banter. "It created a cinematic space where we could just be with the characters, and let their camaraderie come through."

AB TAKE FAROUS OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPE

A LATE BUT DESERVING ADDITION to the Texas Film Hall of Fame: On June 23, John McCall was inducted into the prestigious club, in recognition of his years of financial support for the Austin Film Society. During the evening event, the hair care product mogul was serenaded by his old friend Kinky Friedman, as well as a surprise appearance by Joe Ely.

GOOD NEWS for an Austin regular, director **Yen Tan.** His latest film, period AIDS drama *1985*, has been acquired by **Wolfe Releasing**, who also released his last film, 2013's *Pit Stop*. Read our SXSW interview with Tan about this deeply personal story, "A Different Spirit of Christmas," March 9.

LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION. Remember how we keep saying Austin is a movie town? Now we have the numbers to back it up. Data company Verve Search has trawled through all the shooting locations listed on IMDb, and found that more films and TV shows have been shot in the ATX than in any other city in Texas. With 2,257 credits and counting, we easily beat out Dallas (at No. 2 with 1,537 titles) and Houston (No. 3 at 1,279), and came in 14th overall globally. Sadly, we don't have the state's most used single location: Houston takes the honor, with the Johnson Space Center.

INTERESTED IN LETTING YOUR HOME – or even your hometown – become a film set? New Republic Studios and the Texas Film Commission are running four public meetings in late July explaining the Film Friendly Texas program. That's an initiative to teach communities how they can become more accessible to filmmakers, and

there are currently 17 Film Friendly certified communities around the state, many of which have seen the benefits of production dollars spent in their stores and hotels. Come meet the experts: Mon., July 23, at Bastrop Opera House (711 Spring St., Bastrop); Tue., July 24, at Elgin Public Library (404 N. Main St., Elgin); Wed., July 25, Smithville First National Bank (312 Main St., Smithville); and Thu., July 26, at New Republic Studios (140 Utley Rd., Elgin). The meetings will run from 7-8pm.

THAT'S PRETTY COOL: Not only is the **Capital City Black Film Festival** back after a two-year hiatus, but it's definitely bringing the thunder on its return. Stars Malik Yoba and Leon, aka Yul Brenner and Derice Bannock, will be in town to celebrate the 25th anniversary of beloved sports comedy *Cool Runnings*. CCBFF runs Aug. 30 to Sept. 1.

OUICK NOTES... Austin had a strong showing at the 14th annual **Fantaspoa** genre film festival in Porto Alegre. Brazil, last month: Owen Egerton gave his Rooster Teethproduced horror-comedy Blood Fest its first international outing, while locally shot and cel-shaded rotoscoped crime caper The Next Kill received its world premiere. before the filmmakers flew back to preview some footage at the inaugural Greater Austin Comic Con... Good news for Austin's gaming scene: Kotaku reports that Bethesda **Games Studios** is developing its highly anticipated *Fallout* 76 in part at its Austin branch (formerly known as BattleCry Studios)... Steven Degennaro (Found Footage 3D) has wrapped shooting on his next short... Other Worlds Austin founder Bears Rebecca Fonté raised a massive \$20,251 on Kickstarter for post-production on their new short, an LGBTQ+ horror called "Conversion Therapist."

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






Do I Have Your Attention?

Boots Riley's Sorry to Bother You is the summer's best interruption

A cursory search for recent film reviews utilizing the word "audacious" yields results ranging from what you would expect (Darren Aronofsky's Mother! comes up a lot), to the routine hyperbole slathered on studio tentpoles (Avengers: Infinity War was created in a highly overseen lab, people). But for something that wears that word well, and is truly deserving of it, look no further than Sorry to Bother You, the debut film from hip-hop artist-turned-filmmaker Boots Riley. I'll pull out another old chestnut, the "singular experience," but in this case, it is completely apt.

Supposedly set in an alternative world much like our own (I feel like we should just retire the word "dystopian" and call it a day), the film concerns one Cassius Green (Atlanta's Stanfield), living in his uncle's garage with his subversive girlfriend Detroit (Thompson, consistently stunning), and unemployed. When his friend hips him

to a telemarketing gig, the title of the film becomes apparent as the scenes of his calls to annoyed recipients are hilariously depicted as he literally drops into their home. It is merely the first of a phantasmagorical array of inventiveness and cinematic shenanigans that Riley concocts. After getting some sage advice from old-schooler Danny Glover, Cassius perfects his "white voice" (David

Cross, of course) and climbs up the ladder (or gold elevator) to the upper echelon of selling slave labor to foreign countries. That's the business of Steve Lift (Hammer), a mogul whose Google-esque company offers lifetime contracts and prison housing for shiny happy people looking to improve their lives.

If that sounds odd, it is only the beginning. Riley's film is a welcome hand grenade of subversive power that often reminded me of another incendiary film, Terry Gilliam's classic Brazil. And much like that 1985 gem, Sorry to Bother You's cup spilleth over with so much content at any given time, it has the effect akin to accidentally being dosed with PCP while having a meeting with a corporate

empathy expert (a real thing, FYI). The film takes on a bit more than it can chew, but its humor, its commentary, its continuous and relentless spiral into madness is grounded by Stanfield's laconic

shuffle and Thompson's fierce defiance. This film is by no means perfect, but it is the closest you will come to having your mind blown this summer. Audacious doesn't even begin to describe it.

ANT-MAN AND THE WASP D: Peyton Reed; with Paul Rudd, Evangeline Lilly, Hannah John-Kamen, Abby Ryder Fortson, Michael Douglas, Michelle Pfeiffer, Laurence Fishburne, Michael Peña, Tip "T.I." Harris, David Dastmalchian, Walton Goggins, Bobby Cannavale, Judy Greer, Randall Park. (PG-13, 125 min.)

How do you recover from Avengers: Infinity War? Audiences are still a little tenderized after the mass whittling of Marvel's superhero ranks (and for those that said it doesn't really count because no one stays dead in comics, we all saw you crying). So the obvious solution is to bring back everyone's favorite inadvertent hero, Scott Lang, aka Ant-Man. Back when the original Ant-Man was released in 2015, Paul Rudd's working-class zero was supposed to be the death knell for Marvel, but the raucous crime caper comedy opened new doors to the mega-franchise. However, when he returns to the screen after his last adventure, backing up Cap (his friends call him Cap) as an honorary avenger in Captain America: Civil War, life hasn't been that kind to Lang. He's out of super-hypermax submerged prison the Raft, but he's under house arrest, he's trying to get a security firm off the ground with his bumbling buddies (Dastmalchian, T.I., and the micro-franchise's secret weapon, the megamouth Peña) and Hope van Dyne (Lilly) has had enough of his irresponsible ways. At least he still has his adoring daughter Cassie (Ryder Fortson), and it's only two days until his ankle bracelet comes off.

Of course, this is when trouble comes knocking, direct from the Quantum Realm. Hank Pym (Douglas, channeling his finest

inner curmudgeon) and Hope want what's in his head - the possible whereabouts of Janet van Dyne (Pfeiffer), missing in the space between atoms for 30 years. But they're not the only people with agendas: High-level fence Sonny Burch (Goggins, as irrepressibly sleazy as ever) wants all that delicious tech, and the mysterious Ghost (John-Kamen), who can slip between realities, is after the lost van Dyne for her own nefarious reasons. Meanwhile, Lang's biggest concern is making sure that FBI agent Jimmy Woo (Park) doesn't know he's breaking curfew and turning back to his micro adventuring ways.

It's no spoiler to say this is before Thanos wishes really hard, so the brakes are off for the same kind of giddy adventures in science as the first film, with added giant ants. Returning director Peyton Reed slides straight back into action, and doesn't bother ladling on more exposition – after all, if the audience is baffled by the odd burst of techno-babble, that's fine, because so is Lang. Peña is yet again a glorious scene-stealer (you'll be replaying his truth serum waterfall of words for months), but Rudd remains the heart and soul by stepping back and letting everyone else fill the room. He's one of the great modern straight men, but when he lets rip, as in one rip-snorting exchange with Woo, it's a quick-witted back-and-forth that's easily as funny as a drumming ant, or any of Reed's sight-gag-heavy action sequences.

But this is also Marvel's first co-headlined feature (hey, it's Thor: Ragnarok, not Thor and Loki), and so Lilly gets more of a chance to shine. In the original, she was Lang's foil, kept in check by her father because he didn't want to lose her to his crazy tech. This time, the Wasp is the more straightahead hero, genius scientist, and bona fide ass-kicker (as Lang laments, why didn't he get wings and blasters?), without ever pushing Ant-Man and the Wasp into the high drama of, say, Black Panther. This is the science nerd and gray-collar criminal brigade, and Lilly and Douglas (as sparky a fatherdaughter duo as Lilly and Rudd are as sparring partners) keep it emotionally grounded. After all, that's what Marvel films are always about. Yes, the action sequences are hilarious, and yes, the design department gets to cut gloriously loose with the kaleidoscopic, shifting microverse of the Quantum Realm, but this is first and foremost about family. Reed gets laughs from Lang's antics as he tries not to get caught out of the house by Woo, but you never forget that he's a good father who worries he'll mess up by violating his parole. The world may be small, but the heart, action, and laughs are big. Plus, start demanding your tardigrade action figure now. Science, kids.

THE FIRST PURGE

Let's face the facts: The Marvel Cinematic Universe is the movie franchise we want. The Purge is the one we deserve. The 2013 original was a hand grenade rolled under the door, a stealthily political (and, in hindsight, unnervingly prescient) metaphor for middle-class compliance in an era of mob rule. The second film, 2014's The Purge: Anarchy, asked why otherwise upright citizens would take advantage of this ghoulish endeavor; then 2016's The Purge: Election Year looked straight in the eyes of the theocrats, plutocrats, and oligarchs who would benefit from mass murder.

The key to the series' success was always that it never seemed implausibly far from where America is now. The question is, what was the push? How do you convince a civilized nation to indulge in 12 hours of utter lawlessness, once a year? Well, as shown in The First Purge, it's the experiment, as devised by Dr. May Updale (Tomei), a deranged sociological field research program based on the idea that, if people can just burn out all their anger, they will become law-abiding citizens (and what's a few thousand dead bodies as the cost of a stable society, right?). But even the populist political force New American Founding Fathers can't get this craziness off the ground without convincing the American public (read: the white, middle-class America of the first film). so they organize a test run on Staten Island. Some residents leap at the chance to participate in another paid clinical trial - five grand is five grand, after all. Some treat it like Mardi Gras with even fewer cops. Some, like street corner dealer Isaiah (Wade), see it as a time to get even with no consequences. Yet many are more wisely leery, like Isaiah's sister, community organizer Nya (Davis), and ex-soldier turned drug lord Dmitri (Noel), who doesn't trust anything he doesn't understand.

For the first time, series creator James DeMonaco steps aside from the director's

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chair. Those duties are handed off to Fruitvale Station producer Gerard McMurray, who dealt with similar themes of complicity in his directorial debut, college hazing drama Burning Sands. That means DeMonaco could concentrate on his script, which is no less unflinchingly polemical as the earlier films. Notoriously parsimonious producer Jason Blum also opened up the infamously tight Blumhouse purse strings a little bit for the latest cinematic installment in the franchise, before it makes the leap to TV this fall. Still, for a studio action flick, this is run-and-gun cinema, and McMurray makes every penny count, not least by emulating DeMonaco's trick of showing greater horrors and other people's purges in quick shots, or as protagonists pass by. That said, he doesn't have DeMonaco's deft hand balancing action, horror, and political rhetoric, and supporting characters tend to disappear and reappear when convenient for the plot.


Yet he still delivers a chilling allegory, filled with equal quantities of violent frights and stomach-churning visual metaphor. So four episodes in, and The Purge franchise is as nakedly provocative as ever. In its attacks on scarcely disguised racist and classist policies, and on bad science in the service of worse politics, in its evocations of Blackwater in New Orleans, agent provocateurs, the power of hopelessness, the normalization of extremism, and its crowd-pleasing warning about the easy path to fascism, The First Purge pulls no punches. Like Childish Gambino said, this is America.

THREE IDENTICAL **STRANGERS**

D: Tim Wardle. (PG-13, 96 min.)

What a story! This stranger-than-fiction documentary starts with the astonishing reunion of identical male triplets - Bobby Shafran, Eddy Galland, and David Kellman - back in 1980. Nearly two decades earlier, they had been separated as infants and subsequently adopted by three singularly different families, none of which had any knowledge of the existence of their sons' doppelgängers. The story is told by those intimately familiar with its believe-it-or-not narrative, beginning with the grownup version of Bobby (now a 56-year-old man) excitingly recounting that fateful first day on the campus of an upstate New York community college. The bright-eyed freshman knows no one there, but oddly enough, everyone seems to know him. When one of the students incredulously tells Bobby about Eddy, a former classmate at the school who's Bobby's dead ringer, the two lookalikes waste no time comparing notes: Same birthdate, same birth hospital, same adoption agency. Once their newsworthy human interest story hits the press, it takes an even more bizarre turn when David phones one of the young men's aunts to announce his possible kinship to the two instant celebrities, given he looks exactly like them as well. "Oh my God, they're coming out of the woodwork," she exclaims, before dropping the receiver in shock. It's like an episode of The Twilight Zone scripted from real life.



The initial section of this fascinating movie is a real high. Through home movies and video clips, you witness the exuberant happiness that the immediately inseparable brothers experience in the company of each other and the limelight. Their 15 minutes-plus of fame ticked off in a round of talk show appearances (remember Phil Donahue?). late-night carousing at Studio 54, and even a cameo opposite Madonna in the 1985 film Desperately Seeking Susan. Hugging, holding hands, and grinning from ear to ear, these boys with dark Raphaelite curls are celebrated as proof of nature trumping nurture, inextricably bound together by their DNA. After all, they like the same colors, the same clothing, the same type of women, even the same brand of cigarettes. But the silver lining to their seemingly happy ending starts to tarnish once questions are asked about their adopted family placements and the ethically suspect social experiment in which they unknowingly participated as children. When the answers to those inquiries - slow to come, difficult to comprehend - are revealed. the movie's elation gives way to something darker, sadder, even tragic.

Director Wardle is a fine storyteller, patiently pursuing the truth with an aim to give both the surviving triplets and his audience a sense of closure to this incredible saga. (He gets a big assist from Austin's own Pulitzer

Prize-winning journalist and author Lawrence Wright, whose interest in the topic originated when he was researching an article about identical siblings reared apart in the early Nineties.) Although the movie occasionally stalls, it's only because the facts are not easily forthcoming, rather than due to any fault of the filmmakers. Indeed, when the film eventually challenges its earlier presumptions in the nature vs. nurture debate, you realize how skillfully this unassuming little documentary is put together. Three Identical Strangers may not achieve the kind of redemptive catharsis we wish for here, but it achieves something almost as miraculous, making an otherwise unbelievable story seem believably real.

UNCLE DREW

The Nineties were a banner decade for professional basketball players looking to establish themselves as actors. From Shaquille O'Neal (Kazaam) to Michael Jordan (Space Jam) to Ray Allen (He Got Game), NBA stars could be found in blockbusters and prestige pictures alike, often accompanied by marketing campaigns that leaned heavily on their celebrity to promote the film. With that in mind, the biggest surprise about Uncle Drew isn't that Lionsgate has funded a feature-length adaptation of a popular Pepsi commercial, but that it's taken someone this long to recycle that idea. Believe it or not, it still kinda works.

Ever since he cost his team the championship game in middle school, Dax (Howery) has been willing to leverage everything to become the coach of a successful outdoor basketball team. When his old rival (Kroll) steals his best players out from under him, Dax goes in search of the streetball legend Uncle Drew (Irving), a former phenom who has spent decades out of the spotlight. To Dax's delight, Drew agrees to help him win this year's streetball championship, but there's a catch: Dax must help Drew track down each of his teammates from the Sixties so they can win (or lose) together one last time.

The big draw of Uncle Drew, of course, is watching professional athletes try their hand at physical comedy under layers of silicon. Surprisingly, these performances are often

the best part of the movie. O'Neal is old hat at this type of movie, but it's relative newcomers like Chris Webber and Reggie Miller that steal the show. Howery also holds his own as a comedy leading man, showing that his breakout role as conspiracy theorist TSA agent Rod in Jordan Peele's Get Out was no fluke. Together, Howery and his cadre of newly minted actors wring a surprising amount of humor – and even a few heartfelt moments - out of the movie's slight premise.

Since Uncle Drew is an unapologetic throwback to Nineties comedy, you can also expect a steady barrage of self-referential humor. In one memorable scene, Preacher (Webber) is gently chided about the number of time-outs in the game, a callback to Webber's disastrous mental lapse during the 1993 NCAA championship game. Even Howery's character gets into the action, quipping that he's afraid to get in a car with white strangers ever since he saw Get Out.

Of course, Nineties nostalgia cuts both ways, and the story elements that make this all so pleasantly familiar also limit its creativity. If the humor seems modeled after Nineties blockbusters like Last Action Hero and Space Jam, the storyline bears more in common with children's sports movies. Uncle Drew also commits the major sin of relegating Tiffany Haddish to the role of shrewish exgirlfriend. For better and worse, Uncle Drew feels like the kind of movie that would've cleaned up in the summer of 1998. We'll see how well its game holds up 20 years later.


WHITNEY

D: Kevin Macdonald. (R, 120 min.)

The second film in as many years about the life and death of superstar Whitney Houston is evidence of our deep fascination with the subject. The arc of Houston's career followed the classic mold of the celebrity TV bio, bookended by her spectacular and unparalleled professional rise and scandalous and unseemly death in 2012 at the age of 48. Both films have been directed by master documentarians; 2017's Whitney: Can I Be Me by Nick Broomfield (Kurt & Courtney, Biggie and Tupac), which is currently airing on Showtime, and this weekend's theatrical release of Whitney by Kevin Macdonald (One Day in September, Marley, and the reality-

based The Last King of Scotland). Yet, after nearly four hours of exploration by the two films, questions remain. Although the human tragedy is laid bare, neither film clarifies what it was about Houston's voice and talent that made her so peerless and successful.

Probably no one alive can forget the first time they heard that voice that pierced the silence with the clarity of her timbre and chased the stratosphere with a multioctave range. The first experience usually raises goosebumps. Just ask her mother Cissy Houston, the church-choir directress and inspirational backup singer for the likes of Aretha Franklin, Van Morrison, and Elvis Presley. Cissy was Whitney's vocal coach, and ingrained into her daughter the fundamentals of the craft and the knowledge of how to use it to blow the roof off any church - or arena. Ask Clive Davis, the Arista Records mayerick who cemented his love for her voice with a record contract. And what of her first album release in 1985, which became the bestselling debut album by a woman in history? To hear her sing was to instantly recognize Whitney's singularity - a fact that makes her untimely death all the more sorrowful.

For those who only remember Houston as the train-wreck spectacle she devolved into during her latter years, this documentary will do a good job of providing the basic outline of her life. Macdonald talks to much of her family and others who worked with her and knew her. Even though Whitney was initiated and endorsed by the Houston family, her relatives are very open about her childhood, drug use, and insecurities. In contrast, we're presented with Bobby Brown, who curtly halts conversation when he inexplicably declares that drugs had nothing to do with his wife's death. Mary Jones, Whitney's assistant and the one who found her dead, says for the first time on the record that the singer claimed to have been sexually molested by a female relative during her childhood. The only figure missing here is Robyn Crawford, Whitney's school friend and lover, who stayed by Whitney's side from the beginning until several years into Whitney and Bobby's marriage. Macdonald also includes many of the sadder moments in Houston's career, as when her voice was deemed early in her career to be "not black enough" by figures such as the Rev. Al Sharpton, who dubbed her "Whitey Houston," or when she was booed at the Soul Train Awards.

Macdonald also weaves in contemporary footage of the times – shots of the Newark riots, Ronald Reagan, the Persian Gulf War which help place Houston into her milieu. The clips from performances and TV interviews are abundant, as befits a star who came of age along with the MTV era. This film is more probing than conspiracy-seeker Broomfield's, although neither study fully explains how her life (not to mention that of her only child Bobbi Kristina) ended so piteously. Drug addiction and bad choices are the obvious answers to what caused Houston's notorious downward spiral. However, the question that no one seems to be asking is how Whitney Houston has come to be remembered more for her tragic demise than for her unrivaled success.

The performances (Keoghan and Peters especially) and pacing make for a snappy enough heist film, but those who sit down blindly may be surprised to find a second element in play. Sometimes they are even inserted into the fictional narrative, and as a result, American Animals is as much an exercise in objective truth - or the lack thereof - as it is the retelling of a single series of events. 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The Dangerous World of Jean-Paul Belmondo

AFS EXPLORES THE ACTION STAR BEYOND BREATHLESS by Josh Kupecki

The spectrum of cool can be a fluid and fickle thing: here today, gone tomorrow. There are countless instances of flash-in-pan dilettantes who may have had "it" for those beloved 15 minutes, but are now lost to the rubble of squaresville. But there are icons

who will forever live on as the embodiment of some ineffable energy and charisma that draws us to them. This month **AFS** Cinema, in partnership with the

wonderful Alliance Française d'Austin, is celebrating one of those greats in their series

Mondo Belmondo, highlighting the work of France's greatest export (wine be damned), Jean-Paul Belmondo.

The series pairs both Belmondo's arthouse classics with his time as one of the premier action stars of the time, and it kicks off with the initial salvo of the Nouvelle Vague (shh, don't tell Jean Cocteau), Jean-Luc Godard's Breathless. Whole forests have suffered from the amount of ink and paper used to discuss this seminal film, and rightly so. There are many reasons that

Breathless has attained an iconic status, but Belmondo's presence as Michel (or Laszlo Kovacs) is a heaping help of it. "Full speed ahead, Fred!" he yells in the opening scene (although I always preferred the original French: "Maintenant Je

fonce, Alphonse!") and sends us into this jazzy, breezy, and dizzying deconstruction of gangster films and cinema itself. And guess what? It holds up brilliantly, with Belmondo's nihilistic thug and Jean Seberg's Patricia railing against, well, everything. "I don't know if



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I'm unhappy because I'm not free, or if I'm not free because I'm unhappy," Seberg's character laments at one point. If that doesn't resonate with you, you had better check your pulse. Companion film Léon Morin, Priest casts Belmondo as the titular role of a man grappling with love and war in Jean-Pierre Melville's unsung classic of occupied France. Both films utilize Belmondo's inherent allure to brilliant effect.

But nothing can really prepare your senses for the two films he made with action director Philippe de Broca that round out the series. Belmondo had a penchant, or perhaps death wish, to perform his own stunts (as documented by the many YouTube compilations available), way before that milquetoast Tom Cruise was dangling off of airplanes or mountains, or whatever. There was a time when studio insurance companies didn't have a clause for the continued well-being of their actors, as evidenced in both That Man From Rio and Le Magnifique (aka The Magnificent One). Rio plays it mostly straight, a Eurospy thriller that sees Belmondo traipsing through that lovely city, avoiding exploding cars and thwarting assassins while precariously navigating a high-rise construction site. But it is Le Magnifique that is (in this writer's opinion) the real jewel in this series. An arch and sly parody of the espionage genre so popular at the time, it combines slapstick comedy, thrilling set-pieces, and critical theory into a heady cocktail that even the most jaded cineaste will be picking up their jaw off the floor at regular intervals. Have you ever witnessed a guy in a telephone booth get snatched by a helicopter and dropped into the ocean where a man-eating shark is waiting to dispose of him? Well, that's just the opening scene. Do yourself a favor and get your passport for this celebration of endless Gauloises and derring-dos, and a man who never said no to falling down an enormous rock quarry. And if that is not enough to entice you, get stuffed.

Now, Nancy turns up at Leo and Ellen Lynch's house, saying she may be the missing part of their lives. Nancy's dark appeal is not just in Riseborough's remarkable performance. It's also in the deft and somber touch of first-time feature writer/director Christina Choe. And if you're going to canonize someone, you might as well do it while they're still alive and can enjoy it. By threading together the audio from past speeches, testimony from her 1993 confirmation hearings, and sit-down interviews with the subject herself, the filmmakers cleverly give the impression of Ginsburg narrating her own story. Yet this entirely admiring doc is an incomplete one: Ginsburg's contributions are substantial, but this peppy portrait feels a little lightweight next to her stature. (05/04/2018)

Alas, Emily Blunt is not back for the sequel: However, Del Toro's cryptic hitman is given more dimension in the sequel, where story strands are also developed to show the effect that the border's rampant criminality and violence has on its blameless children. Director Stefano Sollima and cinematographer Dariusz Wolski don't eke out as much tension and visual shock as did Denis Villeneuve and Roger Deakins on the 2015 original, but Sicario: Day of the Soldado nevertheless is fluid, efficient, and bloody. BODY HEAT (1981)

Lawrence Kasdan's debut borrows liberally from Forties and Fifties film noir, and its similarities to Double Indemnity have been duly noted. In Kathleen Turner's square-shouldered, lean, all-white shirt and skirt combos I can't help being reminded of Lana Turner's white-hot outfits in The Postman Always Rings Twice. The three films share the common plot point of two lovers trying to off the woman's husband, yet Turner's Matty Walker elevates the role from femme fatale to master contriver as she seduces William Hurt's shoddy lawyer Ned Racine into thinking he's in control.

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Bidi Bidi Bom Bom

Is the net neutrality repeal another blow to local Tex-Mex musicians and broadcasters?

Last December, the Federal Communications Commission, led by President Donald Trump's chairman designee Ajit Pai, voted 3-2 to reverse previous President Barack Obama's net neutrality rules, which prohibited internet service providers – the companies users pay to access the world wide web - from blocking content, throttling speeds, or charging extra fees for faster internet lanes. The repeal took effect June 11 despite outcry from free internet advocates, a Democratic push to overturn the decision, and even state efforts to ensure equal access to all web content.

Within the music industry, ISPs charging higher fees for streaming and social media access could prove a huge impediment for independent artists and businesses, especially those in non-mainstream genres. In Austin, a pair of Texas-rooted styles, Tejano and conjunto, depend on net neutrality. Can they overcome this obstacle as they've done with a whole series of adversities that have kept the music in danger of local extinction for more than a decade?

Piper LeMoine and Baldomero Frank Cuellar run Rancho Alegre Radio, a homegrown, preservationist nonprofit that recently staged its fifth annual conjunto festival at Stubb's (revisit "Playback: Strictly Conjunto," May 11). Beginning in 2013 with the digitalization of vintage vinyl and artist interviews, they later hosted a Tex-Mex show on KOOP 91.7FM for almost two years until 2017. The two wrote a letter to the FCC in November detailing how the internet saved the genre from disappearing after the loss of terrestrial Tejano radio stations here in the early 2000s.

"A lot of the people that are either musicians in the genre or that own online radio stations - or just fans - need to know this could affect them," says LeMoine.

Born in Central and South Texas, Tejano belongs to a group of American music genres that includes conjunto and orquesta. Those three types are commonly grouped as Tex-Mex due to their origin among Mexican-American communities. Founded in the Seventies, Tejano - complete with synthesizers and rock, R&B, and country influences peaked in popularity two decades later when Selena Quintanilla, "The Queen of Tejano," Emilio Navaira, and David Lee Garza reached nationwide success. At that juncture, Tejano and conjunto radio stations thrived throughout almost every city in Texas.

Then the FCC passed the Telecommunications Act of 1996, which, among other things, allowed the ownership of multiple media businesses by a person or corporation. Suddenly, locally owned radio stations

of all genres sold out to big conglomerates. Most suffered minimal format changes with new ownership, but Tejano stations didn't get off so easy.

"These companies bought the Tejano frequencies and changed the format to another Spanish-language genre," says LeMoine. "They either changed to Norteño or Mexican regional, and for some reason they felt the existing audience wouldn't know the difference. Like, 'It's in Spanish, after all."

In 1996, at least 10 radio stations broadcast Teiano or conjunto in Austin, according to media reports. By the mid-2000s, that number totaled zero. The genre returned to the airwaves in 2007 through KOKE 1600AM, which is nowadays the only Tejano terrestrial station in Austin.

"Unfortunately, Tejano

music rarely receives the national attention it deserves," attests Gary Hartman, director of Texas State University's Center for Texas Music History. "For most of the past two centuries, [Tex-Mex] has mostly been limited to Mexican-American and Latin American audiences. Other than a few brief periods. Tejano has not been adequately recognized by the mainstream media."

KOKE 1600AM

Joe Morales sits behind the microphone in a small North Austin studio.

"You're listening to KOKE 1600AM, the best of Tejano music in town," he announces at the start of his 3-6pm daily shift.

Logging more than 20 years in Tejano radio, Morales' deep voice has become a symbol of Tex-Mex music in Texas. He's experienced the genre's ups and downs. As KOKE's general manager, he works with the station's owner, Joe Garcia.

Both are aware of net neutrality's repeal, but their station's internet presence remains minimal. KOKE doesn't stream its signal or even have a website. A Facebook group page is the frequency's only online portal.

Baldomero Frank Cuellar and Piper LeMoine of Rancho Alegre Radio

Sticking to a traditional radio business model has worked well for KOKE. Despite scoring fewer than two rating points, they enjoy a loyal audience among Hispanic Austinites for several decades now, although they struggle to reach a younger population. And that's not because new generations don't listen to Tejano music, but because most of them simply don't own

an AM radio receiver.

"I told some of my friends and fans, 'I'm doing an interview at KOKE," recounts Tejano singer Ashley Borrero. "And they're like, 'Where can we listen, where can we stream it?' I told them, 'Well, you can't."

Being an AM endeavor means KOKE's reach is limited and its signal

"There are some parts of town where you can't listen to it," concurs LeMoine. "That's where streaming would help them."

At a time when the ownership of radio receivers among 18-to-34-year-olds has decreased from 94% in 2008 to 68% in 2016, an online strategy would seem like the obvious next step to any radio station. For Garcia, it doesn't make much sense.

"Our listenership tends to be an older audience," he says. "People are [streaming radio] because they believe that's where the technology is headed, but it hasn't gotten there. If you see the Grammys, they always say the same thing: 'Listen to radio.' They never say, 'Listen to the internet.' They congratulate radio stations for helping promote the music."

Garcia's family helped pioneer Hispanic radio in Texas. His father, Jose Jaime Garcia Sr., began broadcasting locally in 1952 and debuted Austin's first Spanish-only radio station in 1976, KMXX 102.3FM, which now plays hip-hop as the Beat KPEZ. His son witnessed the millennial media grab of such commerce firsthand.

"The mega-operators here in Texas decided there was more money to be made on Mexican-language radio stations," says Garcia. "They saw it because you go to a Tejano dance and the price is \$10 to \$15. But you go to a Mexican dance and it's \$35 to \$45. So it was that derogative - 'If people are willing to pay more, then we can get more' - they focused on."

All at once, Texas-born genres competed with Mexican regional, Norteño, and Latin pop. And not only in Texas, but nationwide and in Mexico. When Garcia founded the Encino Broadcasting company in 2007 with the purpose of repurchasing KOKE from Border Media Partners, the conglomerate that acquired the station four years earlier, several web-based stations had begun to attract a Tejano fan base.

"It's a micro audience for them," shrugs Garcia. "They've tried to put up events and all have failed. When we do an event, it's usually a big event, like what we do at the rodeo. There were 1,200 one night and 1,500 the next night. It was packed."

While ratings are important, KOKE's executives measure success by music event attendance and revenue from their advertisers, which include Latino nightclubs, restaurants, attorneys, and mechanic garages.

"For advertisers, our product happens to be Tejano, and we're the only chocolate bar in the marketplace," offers Morales.

Last year, KOKE restructured. They moved to their new studios on Parkfield Drive and are in the process of acquiring a translator to broadcast in FM. Opening up to the internet isn't officially part of their plans yet.

"Radio stations in general may be dying out," allows Hartman, a music historian. "Switching over to the internet isn't necessarily a negative thing. In fact, you can reach a global audience that way. So, the internet could actually expand the market for Tejano."

PURETEJANORADIO.COM

Late one night in 2007, Mike Borrero stopped by his tuxedo store in Southeast Austin. He and his friend and then-employee Manny Vasquez needed to finish work for some Mike's Formal Wear customers. They wanted to do it the way they always had, to the rhythm of Tejano music. Problem was, the last remaining Tejano music station in Austin, KTXZ 1560AM, had been taken off the air a few months before following a slow process dating back to 2004.

Dozens of Tejano music stations disappearing proved the single biggest blow to the genre, whose decline began with Selena's murder in 1995. Tejano artists tried their luck mixer, microphone, and a pair of headphones are all the equipment he needs.

Born in Brooklyn to a Puerto Rican father and Mexican mother, Borrero arrived in East Austin at the age of 6 months. Half a century later, when he's not fixing a suit or ironing a tuxedo, DJ Tuxedo Mike reps Tex-Mex. Like PureTejanoRadio.com, Tejano web stations arose all over the Lone Star State after terrestrial radio's decline: ChicanoExpress.com, HotTejano.com, CompadresMusic.com, BNetRadio.com. Many exist as a hobby.

"We don't want to make a profit," admits Borrero. "We just want to share this music. We want to bring people in and help them to rediscover Tejano music. We do it for free, out of our pocket, for passion."

In order to broadcast, an online radio station requires a computer, an internet connection with decent bandwidth, and a streaming service such as Radio.co, Virtual DJ, or SAM Broadcaster, whose subscription rates range from free to \$99 a month. Borrero and Vasquez spend around \$250 a month to keep PureTejanoRadio.com online, including the internet bill and the broadcaster subscription. Since they don't turn a profit, no royalties are levied on the music they stream.

Their station streams on the website, but the TuneIn app – for mobile devices – is the main way people listen. In almost a decade, PureTejanoRadio.com has accrued 90,000 followers on TuneIn.

"Internet radio has helped Tejano music because it allows new artists to emerge.

and even old artists that we haven't heard from," says Vasquez. "Music is still being produced, and it's still moving, especial-

won't find her on Spotify or YouTube without previous exposure. She also says the only way to invite people to her live performances is through online radio and social media announcements. "They haven't played my music on the [Tejano] AM radio station we have here in Austin," she admits. "Austin performers have it even harder, because there are [terrestrial] Tejano radio stations, but most of them are in Houston, Dallas, Corpus, and San Antonio.

Stephanie Bergara inadvertently started up Bidi Bidi Banda by inviting some Tejano musicians to join her for a one-time celebration of Selena. The future frontwoman posted a picture of herself dressed up as the late singer on Instagram and generated massive interest among the fan base. Four years of celebrating Selena's legacy now counts as one of Austin's most popular acts.

"Without the internet, it would have been impossible for it to take

off." she acknowledges.

Whereas Borrero builds web strategies for an online content marketing corporation and applies that savvy to her band's social media, Bergara's worked as a booking agent, manager, and publicist for bands. That knowledge helped land Bidi Bidi Banda an Austin Music Award this year as Best Cover/ Tribute Band and an



tured in a PBS documentary.

"The Tejano music community could stand to pay a lot more attention to mainstream marketing trends," says Bergara. "The original theory behind promoting Tejano music is stuck in the Nineties. Technology and social media aren't going anywhere. If we don't accept that and take advantage of it, then Tejano music will die."

If new internet fees arise from the net neutrality repeal, Bidi Bidi Banda will cover them, but Bergara and Ashley Borrero agree it would constitute a dire blow to Tejano.

"Making it more difficult to access Tejano music would only hurt the people who still love Tejano music," insists Bergara. "It would make it even harder to discover. If Tejano music starts to become less affordable, then it does start dying."

with Norteño or country, while publicists and agents abandoned them to represent musicians of more popular genres. Consequently, mainstream media stopped covering Tejano.

The internet came to the rescue.

"Hev. Manny," said Borrero that night. "You're a deejay, right? You have lots of Tejano music. Why don't we start our own radio station on the internet?"

At that point, online radio registered more listeners in the U.S. than satellite radio, HD radio, and podcasts combined, according to a 2007 Bloomberg report. As mobile devices proliferated, web stations became cheap and easy to start up and maintain. Borrero and Vasquez founded PureTejanoRadio.com not only to give Tejano music an outlet, but to promote Hispanic businesses.

Borrero still operates PureTejanoRadio. com in the back of his tuxedo shop, surrounded by racks of jackets, ties, and shirts. He streams not only Tejano, but conjunto, cumbias, and other musics under a Tex-Mex umbrella. Two computers, an audio ly when it's not a mainstream genre anymore. You don't get that help from mainstream radio."

Borrero's partner in Tex-Mex is the tech behind PureTejanoRadio.com. He works IT for a medical nonprofit full time, then becomes DJ Rysk for a web audience in his free time. Vasquez is aware that the net neutrality repeal could affect PureTejanoRadio.com, but he and Borrero say they're willing to keep their passion project on-air even if it means paying higher fees themselves.

"All musical genres are constantly evolving as they absorb other influences and as audience tastes and technology change." weighs in Hartman. "Tejano is still quite popular throughout Texas, but mainly within the Mexican-American community. Most Anglo Texans and others are not very aware of it. However, it has risen to prominence a few times in the past and will probably do so again."





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

The Thompson Twins' Tom Bailey opens

"It's really down to the fact that everyone was asking, 'Is George in the band?'

So explains Boy George why his classic Eighties pop outfit Culture Club now has his name topping marquees.

"They did briefly attempt to replace me. I'm told it was a total disaster," laughs the singer.

There's no replacing London's George O'Dowd, 57, nor his Culture Club bandmates: Roy Hay, guitar; Mikey Craig, bass; and Jon Moss, drums. They owned the Reagan/Thatcher years with an infectious string of hits that deftly referenced Trojan Records reggae, Motown, and late Seventies electro-pop on dance floor fillers "Do You Really Want to Hurt Me," "Church of the Poison Mind," and "Karma Chameleon." George's croon and inability to be anything other than himself brought cross-dressing sexuality right into American homes via MTV. For many a misfit kid of that time. Boy George was their David Bowie.

Though he admits his references emanate from his Seventies youth, and that Culture Club will give us the hits live, the UK quartet is also serving up their forthcoming album, Life. If astonishing 2014 ballad "More Than Silence" is indicative, this may be the band's best music.

"['Silence'] was the beginning of saying, 'We really need to embrace who we are now," explains George. "You can't be what you were 30 years ago, and it would be insane to try and be that person. This album is called Life, and it's really a reflection of everything we've been through personally, emotionally, publicly. It's quite inward-looking.

DEATH WILL TREMBLE EP **RELEASE** Come & Take It Live, Saturday 7

"We are here to laugh at the odds and live our lives so well that Death will tremble to take us." So wrote Charles Bukowski, and Austin doom merchants DWT make it so on their 14-minute, single-track EP, Departures. Where 2016 full-length Mona bore the elephantine grief of frontman/guitarist tandem Hunter and Chase Townsend losing their father, the follow-up thickens the sludge, lowers tempos, and continues screaming against the dying of the light: "It's been bad before, but it's getting worse." - Raoul Hernandez

IRON AGE Hotel Vegas, Sunday 8

A 5pm matinee sans pre-sales mobs a rare performance by Iron Age. The exquisite hardcore quintet, informed by crusty punk, thrash metal, and latent fantasy themes, was Austin's best heavy act of the late Aughts, peaking with 2009 masterpiece The Sleeping Eye. Now, napalm-throated

Jason Tarpey leads them into battle once a year at best. Afflictive Nature, Skourge, and Erupt open. - Kevin Curtin

BELLOWS, CAROLINE SAYS Mohawk, Sunday 8

Indie folk project of Brooklynite Oliver Kalb, Bellows diverted into electronic aesthetics and bedroom pop sincerity on 2016's Fist & Palm. The producer's latest, "Housekeeping," continues the trend for a tumbling, delicate sing-along. Caroline Sallee joins with slightly sardonic, introspective melodies from ATX sophomore LP No Fool Like an Old Fool. Archvillains of Midwestern basement punk, the re-emergence of Drunks With Guns (1984-1990) constitutes an unlikely reunion. Fronted by notorious miscreant Mike Doskocil, DWG's noxious, low-tempo scuzz elicited uncivilized anthems that appealed to GG Allin fans. Their Austin infiltration pairs with heavy experimental alchemists USA/Mexico, featuring Butthole Surfers beatsman King Coffey, plus noisy post-hardcore huffers Exhalants and Dallas' Hoaries. - Kevin Curtin

CODE ORANGE Barracuda, Tuesday 10

Pittsburgh's Code Orange Kids evolved from self-described "really straightforward punk" into a death metal-tinged hardcore act of intensely destructive power. Abrasive, doomladen, and crushingly heavy, they've parlayed Helmet one-chord chunkchunk-chunk riffs into a unique weapon with the same kill radius as vintage Slayer. Los Angeles' Twitching Tongues, New York's Show Me the Body, and Boston's Vein all tread similar core - Tim Stegall





You have to fake like it doesn't hurt when a toddler kicks you in the groin. You have to fake like Trump voters are contributing anything valuable to American political discourse.

Wait, fuck that. No you don't. Anyone who doesn't know the difference between there, their, and they're doesn't deserve to be treated like they're some sort of savant when it comes to governmental policy. Fuck. That. Shit. Sorry red hat dunce cap, you need to bring something stronger than third grade grammar skills and pigheaded macho bravado in order to even hope to bust out of the Trump penalty box.

Similarly, you shouldn't have to fake an orgasm. I get it. 

How Can I Increase My Chances to Win My **Property Tax Protest?**

Property tax protests have been filed in record numbers in Travis County this year. Once the written protest is filed, the property owner will have the opportunity to go before the Appraisal Review Board (ARB). The ARB is a group of citizens appointed by the appraisal district's board of directors who are authorized to resolve disputes between taxpayers and the appraisal district. The ARB listens to evidence from both the property owner/taxpayer and the county and ultimately determines whether the appraisal district has acted properly.

Be organized, stick to relevant facts, and keep your presentation simple and straightforward during the ARB hearing. The ARB is required to base its decisions on evidence. Evidence the ARB may consider persuasive includes the following:

· Defects not mentioned in the district's survey (cracked foundation, inadequate plumbing, and other property limand/or get supporting statements from builders, contractors, or appraisers to support your position:

- · Incorrect measurements (lot size, square footage, etc.) locate deed records, surveys, or blueprints and take photos to prove the inaccuracy;
- · Comparison properties is there a big difference between the appraised value of your home and others like it in your area? If yes, legitimate comparison sales may demonstrate that your property was not treated equally:
- · Hire professionals a property owner may want to consider hiring an independent appraiser and/or attorney if the amount in dispute is significant.

The ARB will provide at least 15 days' notice of the hearing date (most hearings are conducted between May and August). The taxpayer will also receive a copy of ARB procedures and "Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies & Responsibilities," which will explain the hearing process in more detail. 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

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
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
