SOLAR SOLUTION FOR AISD

Dear Editor.

I would like to bring to your attention that there's an obvious way the [Austin Independent School District] can begin to save hundreds of thousands of dollars, and likely even more, with money that is already at their disposal: Use inhand bond money to install solar panels on school roofs. [See "AISD: Thinking Outside the Schoolhouse," News, July 20, for more about the AISD budget.1

In 2013, Austin voters approved \$20 million for energy efficiency as part of Proposition 1. Half of

this money was allocated for installing solar panels on the roofs of Austin public schools. However, most of this money has yet to be touched.

Four schools that did install solar panels are now saving \$83,727 on their electricity bill each year. These savings are in addition to the Austin Energy's Performance Based Incentive program, which would issue compensation of \$398.411.90 within 10 years to AISD. The district could shave off a million dollars from their electricity bill each year if they just leveraged this available bond money.

With solar panels now on 44 of our schools, AISD is a national leader in developing a sustainable future. Solar schools are helping AISD to save money, curb emissions that contribute to global warming, and improve public health through reduced air pollution. The benefits of solar also extend to the classroom: Solar energy principles can serve as valuable learning opportunities that connect traditional classroom learning with hands-on, state-of-the-art technology.

By simply committing to solar on 100% of our schools, we can simultaneously provide healthier living conditions for our communities and help the growing budget deficit. Alexia Heinrich

WASHINGTON TO MICHIGAN On Tuesday, the City Commission of Grand Rapids, Mich., voted to appoint Austin Assistant City Manager Mark Washington as its new city manager. Washington has been an Austin administrator for nine years, including the last three as ACM with primary responsibilities over human resources and communications.

TRAIN-ING DAY? Also on Monday, a specialcalled "discussion" meeting – noon at the Palmer Events Center, jointly with the Capital Metro Board of Directors - focusing on "Federal Transit Administration grant opportunities, design and environmental review processes, and potential construction procurement options." Several council members are expected to attend.

MIGHTY MOUTH ON TRIAL Proceedings began Wednesday in the defamation trial of Alex Jones, as parents of a child murdered in 2012 at Sandy Hook Elementary School seek to hold Jones accountable for spreading lies about the school massacre. Jones is countersuing, claiming "free speech" under the Texas Citizens Participation Act.

COPS BEHAVING BADLY Austin Police Detective Chris Vetrano was arrested Monday and charged with animal cruelty and endangering a child after Kyle police say he struck a dog with a broom and put his son at risk of being bit.

AND PARAMEDICS, TOO Bret Burke was arrested in Cedar Park on Wednesday and charged with two counts of indecency with a child/sexual contact, one stemming from an incident in August 2014, and the other from last Christmas.

Ground Zero for Zero Tolerance

SOUTHWEST KEY BECOMES THE LOCAL SYMBOL OF BRUTAL U.S. POLICY

Austin nonprofit Southwest Key Programs is enduring a public relations pounding for its involvement in the Trump administration's "zero-tolerance" policy targeting

undocumented immigrants, and the ongoing scandal of "separated families." When the stories broke initially, of families being separated at the border by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement - and of what became of thousands of children transferred to shelters managed by various nonprofits, Southwest Key being the largest – the organization

was referring all media questions to the Office of Refugee Resettlement, their federal funders (under U.S. Health and Human Services) who keep a tight rein on all their contractors ("Point Austin: Suffer the Little Children," June 8).

More recently, after the feds officially ended the family separations - but not the "zero tolerance" for border-crossings -Southwest Key administrators, beginning

> with CEO Juan Sanchez, have tried to defend themselves. In an op-ed, Sanchez wrote that all the children are cared for in a "safe, childfriendly and culturally appropriate way ... [by] staff who give compassionate care in a nurturing environment. ... This has been the case for the past 20 years that Southwest Key has operated unaccompanied minor shelters."

Nevertheless, once the shelters were required to accept not just "unaccompanied minors" but also the children kidnapped by ICE as an explicit deterrent against future refugees, it was inevitable that the shelter operators would find themselves targeted

by public criticism. Southwest Key's national headquarters in Austin has seen demonstrations, and another occurred at Sanchez's Northwest Austin home. Protesters are demanding that Southwest Key end its federal contracts - an unlikely prospect, structurally or financially - and that the city of Austin and Travis County end any programs or funding connected to Southwest Key.

Manufacturing Refugees

Since it's a visible target, it's understandable that local activists would single out Southwest Key for criticism of the federal immigration crackdown. But according to Southwest Key spokesman Jeff Eller, the only local contract held by Southwest Key is for an annual arts program, at \$15,000/year (although they may hold other contracts through their for-profit affiliates). Next to the half-million or so the organization will receive from U.S. Health and Human

Services in 2018 alone, the local funding is a trifle. More immediately alarming is the specific issue of the separated children, but Eller insisted last week that all such children who had been in the care of Southwest Key have been accounted for, and that the actual reunifications specifically are handled either by ORR or ICE. "Every child that was approved for reunification, who [was] under our care," Eller told me, "we were able to bring to the designated place as determined by ICE."

Despite the relentless headlines, only about 10% of the children in Southwest Key shelters were among the "separated" group, and it's since become clear that the federal officials who instituted the separations policy had no plan for what to do with the children after separation, for they did not even attempt to track their scattered whereabouts. (Indeed, a congressional hearing this week revealed that officials were warned by HHS they would be traumatizing children, but were unmoved - the priority was deterrence of future refugees.)

That's why more than 700 (of the originally estimated 2,700) children have indeed not been reunited - their parents were either precipitously deported, have waived reunification (under duress), or have been designated "red flag" (suspicious) cases that shouldn't be reunited. Despite Southwest Key's assurances, it is simply impossible to know whether all the eligible kidnapped children have indeed been returned to their families.

Meanwhile, thousands more unaccompanied minor children remain in various stages of transition, with the whole process further encumbered by the new "no-tolerance" policy. It's a gigantic and disgraceful mess, greatly aggravated by the Trump administration. But less egregious procedures have been in place for a decade or more, as a dysfunctional Congress has repeatedly refused to address immigration, and years of Central American chaos (exacerbated both by U.S. drug wars and literal wars) have generated thousands more refugees.

What Goes Around

The grand and bitter result is that we've all been made complicit - not only in U.S. immigration policies that have now reached a historical nadir of kidnapped children, but in reckless U.S. foreign policies that have helped generate millions of people fleeing violence and starvation. That's true not only in Central America. but across the Middle East, Africa, and elsewhere. It's easy to point our fingers at Southwest Key - or whoever is assigned to care for these thousands of refugee children - and absolve ourselves of enabling those outrages to continue. For decades, the U.S. has attempted to impose military solutions on political quandaries, with inevitably dismal results - while we then try to build bureaucratic or real walls between ourselves and the chaos we've engendered. As Malcolm X once put it in another context, the chickens always come home to roost.

CodeNEXT: Kicked

MAYOR. COUNCIL APPEAR DESTINED TO QUASH LAND USE REWRITE

Mayor **Steve Adler** dropped an \$8 million bombshell on CodeNEXT Wednesday afternoon when he suggested on City Council's online message board that he and his colleagues scrap the land use rewrite and start over. Adler called the ongoing process "so divisive and poisoned," and suggested directing City Manager Spencer Cronk to help create a new process that "will help us move forward together."

The "us," of course, represents the entire city of Austin, which has grown increasingly polarized over the zoning rewrite, with one camp calling for better preservation of neighborhoods and the other calling for greater densification to supply more housing. Both sides believe their approach will help put an end to displacement, demolitions, and gentrification, and the discourse is growing ever more unproductive.

Adler has long acknowledged the conversational divide that exists around CodeNEXT who can forget the "Team Austin" uniforms he distributed to colleagues when Council first took up the rewrite - and on Wednesday attempted to re-form some consensus. "It's time to evaluate where we are," he wrote. "Is the current process so poisoned that we need a new and different approach that encourages openness, discussion, and finding the truth, rather than the misinformation, hyperbole, fearmongering, and divisive rhetoric we have seen?" No doubt, that has been the case for quite some time.

Still, the announcement comes as somewhat of a shock, although one that may have been presaged by a memo sent last week by interim Assistant City Manager Joe Pantalion informing Council that CodeNEXT testing was not going to meet the Aug. 31 deadline (see "Naked City," facing) and of possible changes to **floodplain regulations** due to new data from the National Weather Service's Atlas **14** study. Council ordered that testing in hopes of better understanding possible effects of the proposed rewrite, and the delay has added more stress. Adler wrote that the floodplain changes "alone might justify recalculating and considering new changes to our land development code in order

to achieve the goals we seek." It didn't take two hours for Adler's colleagues to align in agreement with the mayor's pro-

posal. Ann Kitchen wrote, "It's time to stop, think, and reboot this process, working with our new City Manager," and Jimmy

Flannigan followed by citing the "significant disruptions" that

have hampered the long-running process. He submitted a resolution with Delia Garza,

Greg Casar, and Pio Renteria that calls on Cronk to "develop and propose a new process leading to a Land Development Code that achieves the stated goals of the City as outlined in the Imagine Austin

Comprehensive Plan, the Strategic Housing Blueprint, and the Austin Strategic Direction 2023 Plan." That quite likely will get brought up and voted on at Council's next regular meeting, Aug. 9. With those four

on the record, joining Adler, Kitchen, and the corner of council members who've long advocated for shivving the rewrite, CodeNEXT's fate is all but sealed.

But it's worth wondering whether following the aforementioned goals will be enough for Cronk to move forward. As the short run of Council work sessions concerning CodeNEXT showed in June, the dais at present is unable to provide a consensus set of ideals for city staff to take into the process, and members can't even agree on uniform interpretations of those three strategic plans. Adler sought

> to draw attention to the rewrite's troubled origins, calling out the "previous at-large council" that "selected our CodeNEXT consultant, Opticos," and oversaw the first two years of progress (or its ineffective equivalent) before the 10-1 body took over. Maybe so, but the 10-1 still had plenty of time to let their priorities be known,

whether consensus or otherwise. Yet by the time the final draft arrived on the dais, members were still sorting out macrolevel disagreements about what zoning should look like in Austin while simultaneously attempting to amend small passages.

So Council will soon vote to kill CodeNEXT, but in doing so must avoid again punting the dirty work to staff and the land use commissions. It's their job to provide direction; that's something they oughta do.

CODENEXT AT WORK (WHILE IT STILL CAN)

Despite the mayor's call to end CodeNEXT, and expectations that City Council could vote on such a proposal as soon as Aug. 9, the work for now continues. City staff overseeing the land use rewrite continue forging ahead on CodeNEXT testing, as directed by Council on June 28.

The city manager's office is charged with organizing a working group of design, development, and technical experts to review, model, and test the latest CodeNEXT draft, with attention placed on the impacts of non-zoning sections (such as housing capacity, Imagine Austin goals, and financial feasibility). A report on the findings is due Aug. 31, but a memo sent last week by interim Assistant City Manager Joe Pantalion alerted the mayor and Council to a lengthy list of challenges, including difficulty finding a diverse group of volunteers on short notice; logistical challenges; limited availability of technical staff and consultants; and locating space capable of recording to conform with the Texas Open Meetings Act. Once participants and meeting dates are set, staff will update Council with an expected completion date.

David Carroll, the CodeNEXT lead at the local chapter of American Institute of Architects, confirmed that AIA will "definitely" be involved in the testing. He said participants are working with staff to identify dates in August and early September to get the highest attendance. He expects two days for residential testing and two days for commercial and corridor testing.

Though Council returns for meetings this week, it remains uncertain when, or whether, the dais will resume CodeNEXT deliberations. However, Council will discuss the November election at its first regular meeting on Aug. 9, including the addition of the land use petition, and a City Charter amendment to include a removal process for Planning commissioners. KENDRA SCOTT & THE PFLUGERVILLE CPC

Did one of Austin's most popular retailers cozy up to an anti-choice crisis pregnancy center? The Texas Handmaids, reproductive rights activists that don red robes in the spirit of Margaret Atwood's dystopian classic, have been on a steady letter- and email-writing campaign to Kendra Scott after the local jewelry company's Domain store threw a fundraiser this spring for the Pflugerville Pregnancy Resource Center, as part of their philanthropic "Kendra Gives Back" program.

As the Chronicle recently reported, crisis pregnancy centers take aim at vulnerable pregnant women with the stated mission to deter them from abortion, using medical misinformation, shame, and religious proselytizing to achieve that goal. The Pflugerville CPC's website, for instance, lists four options a woman may choose if she is pregnant and unsure, which include marriage and adoption - the fifth bullet point reads "Facts About Abortion" and links to the state's errorriddled "Woman's Right to Know" booklet. The local CPC "envisions a local community where women do not experience the emotional burdens associated with abortion" and will "work with local leaders and churches" to "reduce the number of abortions in Central Texas," with help "pointing women to Jesus Christ."

Fed up with a lack of response from the company, the Handmaids planned a protest at the Kendra Scott headquarters for Saturday, Aug. 4. We reached out to Kendra Scott for comment about their support for the CPC. Rather than doubling down on defense, the company admitted to their errors.

"In this particular instance, our 'we never say no' motto unfortunately overshadowed our responsibility to properly research and understand who and how we were supporting," said company spokesperson Patti Kelly. "As a result, we are carefully reviewing our internal vetting procedures for selecting organizations we partner with in the future. We have no plans to work with the Pflugerville Pregnancy Resource Center again and are committed to working with organizations that are fully transparent about their practices."

That same day, Kelly also sent a message to the Handmaids, assuring them of Scott's "commitment" to halt any support to these CPCs in the future. "Kendra Scott has agreed to stop fundraising for fake clinics so we are happy to cancel this protest! Woo hoo!" wrote the Handmaids, in a victory for pro-choice iridescent drusy pendant necklace lovers everywhere. - Mary Tuma

SCOOTER RULES

This Thursday is Aug. 2, which means that two emergency rules for dockless mobility operators (scooters) pertaining to lock-to requirements and API (application programming interface) data reporting were supposed to go into effect yesterday, but didn't. On Tuesday, Transportation Department Director Robert Spillar issued a memo to the mayor and City Council saying that his office and the law department jointly recommend "delaying/not enforcing" the two provisions until "further understanding can be gained" of the challenges they may pose to the industry. The rest of the emergency rules remain in effect, however; Spillar hopes to present a set of proposed rules to city boards and commissions in early August, with a final draft being posted in early September, thus beginning a 31-day comment period. If all goes according to plan, Spillar will have that final set of rules in place by late October, though ATD will need to account for appeals after that. - Chase Hoffberger

COUNTY OFFICIALS TO GET BIG RAISES

Travis County commissioners voted almost unanimously on Tuesday to give themselves some **plush raises**. The 4-1 decision was part of a larger motion to increase the salaries of almost all county elected officials. County Judge Sarah **Eckhardt** and commissioners **Brigid Shea, Jeff Travillion,** and Margaret Gómez approved the raises, which will

by more than \$13,000 each. Eckhardt will now make \$140,945 a year - a 10% raise and the commissioners will make \$119.508, up 13%, Sheriff Sally Hernandez will get an increase of almost \$9,000, to \$155,238 a year, and County Treasurer **Dolores Ortega** Carter will get a bump of \$11,411, bringing her to \$113,980. Other elected officials will receive more modest raises.

Tuesday's vote represents just the first phase of three consecutive years of raises for elected officials, which the commissioners court has approved, saving the figures should be brought in line with salaries of elected officials in certain other Texas counties. The lone dissenter, conservative Gerald Daugherty, voiced his strong disagreement with the move. "Everybody knows that I'm not going to vote for this," he said on Tuesday, "In 2002, when I came on the court, the pay was \$66,000. I don't know how in the world I am going to explain this to people. And I guarantee you, people are watching this - watching us take a committed 40% increase over the next three years and watching our salaries grow." - Lindsay Stafford Mader

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Musical Chairs

CRONK TO REORGANIZE MANAGEMENT TEAM

Last week, Austin City Manager Spencer Cronk met with his five assistant city managers and subsequently released a memo describing a new administrative organization, including the potential of replacements within that management team. The process, Cronk wrote in the memo sent to all department directors, will include an "open recruitment" for new assistant CMs to fill positions that will be based on the six "strategic outcomes" defined and targeted last year by City Council: "safety," "health and environment," "culture and lifelong learning," "economic opportunity and affordability," "mobility," and "government that works for all."

The reorientation itself is not a surprise - Council has been advocating the change in emphasis for more than a year, and the FY 2019 city budget (to be formally proposed by Cronk on Aug. 6) is being prepared under the "strategic outcome" matrix. But Cronk's announcement that he'll be reshuffling the ACMs is definitely a new wrinkle. Under his plan, Chief Financial Officer **Elaine Hart** (the acting city manager for 16 months prior to Cronk's arrival) will serve as deputy city manager until her scheduled retirement late next year, and will become responsible for the "government that works" city goal.

Meanwhile, Cronk said he'll be filling four new ACM positions, in phases. For Phase I (fall 2018), he will hire or appoint an ACM who will be responsible for both health and environment and culture and lifelong learning, and another responsible for economic opportunity and affordability. In Phase II (winter 2018/2019) will come two appointments, for safety and mobility. Finally, he intends to find a successor to Hart as deputy by the spring of 2019.

Although Cronk promises "no immediate impact on the day-to-day work of city departments," the current ACMs have indirectly been put on notice that should they wish to survive the transition, they'll need to plan with the new outcomes in mind. Cronk wrote: "This is an institutional departure from the past, combining both management for a portfolio of departments as well as enterprise responsibility for outcomes. More emphasis will be placed on finding cross-departmental and external stakeholder solutions to moving the needle on the strategic outcome indicators."

When Cronk made his announcement, it initially appeared that at least one of the current administrators - five ACMs plus Hart – would either be reassigned or end up without a musical chair. But that conundrum was made easier on Tuesday, when the Grand Rapids (Michigan) City Commission voted 6-1 to appoint Austin ACM Mark Washington as its new city manager, leaving Cronk with only five current appointees to consider.

The five ACMs and their current thumbnail areas of responsibility are: Rey Arellano (public safety); Robert Goode (infrastructure services/transportation); Sara Hensley (parks/libraries/animal services/health); Joe Pantalion (development/aviation/planning/ watershed); and Washington (human resources/fleet/communications). Pantalion and Hensley are both interim appointees and could presumably return to their original departmental assignments, but in any event Cronk's announcement reflects that what are now six managerial positions will become five (with one administrator responsible for two of the six "outcomes").

Cronk's memo said he intends the transition process to be "deliberate and thoughtful," and in a brief conversation following the announcement, told me that a primary goal of the realignment is to encourage the ACMs to "take more ownership of these larger



outcomes." He said the new arrangement is intended to be a "structural change" rather than an "individual or personnel change," and that in accepting the Austin position, "I was fortunate to join professionals who care about the city and their jobs, and who recognize that this is the next step in the realignment" anticipated by Council's move to outcome-based management.

Cronk added that the six outcomes will become the basis not only of departmental alignments, but of evaluating the metrics of administrative progress - "whether or not we're moving the needle on these larger outcomes," and whether city residents as well as city employees are responding positively to the changes. He cited Watershed Protection as an example of an infrastructure department that also includes a "huge component of public safety" - and said aspects like those will influence the final areas of ACM responsibility. He added that in making those assignments, he will also be cognizant of the "relative workload" in each ACM portfolio.

Acknowledging that the announced plan reduces the number of administrators by one, Cronk said, "Yes, I am streamlining a bit, and trying to make sure that the individual office is aligned with achieving the larger objectives."

In a somewhat related move, Cronk also announced that his proposed FY 2019 city budget, usually presented directly to Council, will instead be presented to Council and the public in a special-called meeting on Monday, Aug. 6, 3:30pm, at the Mexican American Cultural Center. "I want people to understand these changes," he said, "and I'm simply making it more in line with transparency and openness - getting out of City Hall and out into the community. I'll give a speech giving that message loud and clear." - Michael King

Council: Almost Time Again

BACK FROM SUMMER BREAK

When City Council meets again on Aug. 9 for its first regular meeting in six weeks, the dais will include two outgoing members. **Ora Houston** announced earlier this summer that she doesn't plan to seek re-election in District 1, and more recently Ellen Troxclair decided she won't run in District 8. Troxclair ran back to her austerity hounds (in this case, Citizens for an Accountable Austin) almost immediately, signing her name to the petition to run an efficiency audit on the city. Houston, on the other hand, promised that she'll use the remainder of her time on the dais to focus on a few key issues. The CMs still vying for re-election (Pio Renteria in D3; Ann Kitchen, thus far unopposed in D5; Kathie Tovo in D9; plus Mayor Steve Adler) must also contend with campaign schedules intensifying in the fall.

And there are a few issues that Council has been saving up for (including expectations that they'll put the kibosh on CodeNEXT, see p.8) as next week's agenda comes into focus:

CHAPTER 380 AGREEMENTS

Changes to the city's economic incentive program have been in the works for the better part of the year. The overhaul would mean that the program emphasizes small and local **business** more than in previous years. The Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce, the Capital Area Council of Governments, and the Austin Independent Business Alliance have all declared support for the changes.

NEGOTIATIONS WITH PRECOURT

In June, Council told City Manager Spencer Cronk to put together a basic set of terms for a deal between the city and Precourt Sports Ventures, which wants to bring Major League Soccer to McKalla Place. Plenty of people seem to want MLS in Austin (expect to see pro-soccer scarves out in force), but Leslie Pool - who represents the district that houses McKalla Place - has led concerns about getting a fair deal. See "Transfer Fees," p.14, for more on this one.

POLICE SICK PAY

This item, if passed, would create a **temporary donated** sick leave program under the terms of the meet-and-confer agreement that expired in December. (Negotiations for a new contract are ongoing.) The program lets officers donate their sick leave to a colleague who has used all of their allotted hours - a practice most often used when an officer is struck by serious illness or injury. Justice advocates have generally protested these items of late, pointing out that just this spring the Austin Police Association turned its back on an interim deal that would've kept the pre-existing language intact.

BUDGET PUBLIC COMMENT

Everybody in Austin already has an opinion all of the time, and that is doubly true during the annual carving up of the budget. Expect law-and-order folks to holler for more cops, and others to try to divert any surplus funds (wherever they may exist!) to **Health & Human Services**. Then watch later as Council haggles over where to put its last buck-fifty. - Nina Hernandez

FILINGS REINFORCE A

PROBLEMATIC PATTERN

AT CASA PADRE.

MISTREATMENT AT A SOUTHWEST KEY SHELTER

Death threats and gang violence in Guatemala forced Blanca to flee to Texas with her 4-year-old daughter, the result of repeated rape by her brother-in-law, a "very violent man that the police do not bother at all." On May 24, the two were picked up by Border Patrol under the Trump administration's "zero-tolerance" policy and placed in detention. Feeling sick, Blanca was denied medicine and not permitted to shower for five days. They were then taken to the South Texas Family Residential Center in Dilley, Texas. During a meeting with ICE officials, she was forced to sign documents in English that she barely understood; her legal rights were vaguely explained to her.

New court filings detail disturbing stories of degrading conditions under the federal government's watch faced by more than 200 migrants fleeing violence largely from Central America who sought to make a better life in Texas, California, and elsewhere. The filings are part of a three-decades-old case, known as the Flores agreement, that helped gain better protections for migrant minors. It allows lawvers to examine conditions periodically and keep the feds accountable. In first-hand written accounts, migrants describe rotten food, soiled water, near freezing and overcrowded rooms, lack

of medical attention, and lack of access to hygiene among the wretched conditions in U.S. Customs and Border Protection facilities and federal detention cen-

ters. Some also face insults and physical abuse. Attorneys with the Center for Human Rights & Constitutional Law hope to secure a court-appointed "special monitor" to ensure that immigration officials rectify the violations. The "unsafe treatment of children continues unabated," the filing reads. "Rather than signaling a willingness to end their breach of the Agreement, defendants have doubled down on their breach seemingly for no other reason than that's what the President wants."

As a matter of policy, CBP does not com-

ment on pending litigation, wrote a spokesperson. "However, lack of comment should not be construed as agreement or stipulation with any of the allegations. CBP takes all allegations seriously, and investigates all formal complaints."

The filings include harrowing stories of migrant adults and children, including those held at Casa Padre, a Brownsville youth shelter run by local nonprofit Southwest Key, and the largest such facility in the U.S. The East Austin organization has drawn ire over its decision to house children separated at the border, and faced criticism for lucrative government contracts and CEO Juan Sanchez's sizable salary ("The Duality of Southwest Key," June 29). State records show nearly 250 violations at SWKey's 16 Texas facilities over the past three years, the Chronicle found - and recent court filings reinforce a problematic pattern.

Elmer, a 15-year-old from Central America, describes the fear he felt after being taken to a Border Patrol cell earlier this year. He's spent the past six months at Casa Padre. "They write reports on children acting up and breaking rules. I am afraid that if I get any report on me, I will not be released and it will affect my immigration status," he writes. "These kinds of rules make me feel

like I cannot act like a kid like I used to." Elmer expresses a total loss of direction in figuring out how to break free from Casa Padre, writing he was never made aware of

his rights under the Flores agreement and has not received access to an attorney. "I have no idea when I will be reunited with family here in the U.S."

Sergio was separated from his father when they tried to cross the border less than two months ago; he has only spoken to him for 20 minutes since then. "I had absolutely no idea what was going on and have been very scared," he writes in a testimony taken in July. When he cried over the situation in the bathroom, a Casa Padre staffer came in and asked him why he was being



such a "cry baby" and proceeded to hurl swear words at the young boy. "It made me feel very bad and very ashamed," he writes. Another teenager held at Casa Padre, also named **Elmer**, alleges facility workers won't let him see a doctor, canceled a dentist appointment, and prevented him from attending church. They also make children spend time outside in the "unbearable" sun and do not provide sunscreen, he says. "They do not give us enough food and I am always hungry." Elmer says children are told if they escape Casa Padre they will be considered a "criminal" and the police will come looking for them. "There is no freedom here," he writes.

Jay Lozano of Frente de Liberación Inmigrante, a newly formed local coalition critical of SWKey, told me the court declarations from inside shelters are "just more confirmation of a long list of abuses in direct contradiction to SWKey's claims that they 'do a better job,' and if they don't do it someone else will. They aren't any more humane than anybody else, which is why they don't deserve to act like it. SWKey isn't some passive provider - they are a willing partner in the immigrant detention and deportation complex." Asked to comment on those allegations. SWKev spokesperson Jeff Eller said that since the Flores litigation is proceeding, "it would not be appropriate to comment at this time."

Meanwhile, activists continue to protest the group, as they did outside Sanchez's home earlier this summer. Sanchez came to Austin to "co-opt nuestra gente," said Cynthia Valdez with LULAC District 7, one of the groups leading the protest. "He actively went out and sought approval to imprison babies and children. He is an enabler of Trump and the White House administration." The protest coincided with the court-imposed deadline to reunite all separated children. While the government has matched 1,820 children to parents, more than 700 children remain in government shelters because their parents have been deported, their cases are still under review, or they hold criminal records.

Underscoring the community divide, some LULAC District 12 members at the rally held signs in support of SWKey. Sanchez appeared alongside the protest, saying he's willing to "sit down and have a conversation" with protesters and that he had brought snacks and water for them. "We want an opportunity to explain to them what Southwest Key does and why we do what we do," said Sanchez, his voice barely audible, drowned out by a bullhorn condemning their involvement in child separa-- Mary Tuma

Sexual Assault Class Action Suit Adds Five New Plaintiffs

Five new plaintiffs have been added to a sexual assault federal class action suit against the city of Austin, Travis County, and local law enforcement. The more robust complaint, which now details eight women's accounts of sexual assault and the subsequent abandonment of their cases by local law enforcement, was filed Wednesday afternoon.

Elizabeth Myers, one of several lawyers representing the plaintiffs, said more than 40 women have reached out since the complaint was filed on June 18. The suit alleges that systemic failures within law enforcement have led to discrimination and mistreatment of women rape survivors in Travis County.

The new accounts illustrate a "far-reaching, systemic problem that needs to be fixed" by the defendants, said Myers, who noted that while each woman's story is different - one was kidnapped and repeatedly raped for 12 hours by three men; another was violently raped by her boyfriend while her child was in the house; a third, assaulted by a nurse during a routine

medical exam; a fourth, drugged, raped, and left on train tracks; and the fifth, sexually assaulted by another patient at Austin State Hospital - the common thread is their interaction with the system meant to protect them.

The updated complaint follows four motions to dismiss from the defendants. One motion, filed jointly by D.A. Margaret Moore and her predecessor, **Rosemary Lehmberg**, argues that the "moral and legal duty of the elected District Attorney [is] not to convict, but to seek justice. ... The District Attorney must exercise prosecutorial discretion to balance the needs of a victim, the rights of an accused, and the safety of the community. In so doing, the District Attorney necessarily makes decisions that some agree with and some do not." It goes on to say the "law affords District Attorneys protection from lawsuits such as this."

The plaintiffs' response asserts: "Every Defendant in this lawsuit is legally required to provide equal protection to the women of Travis County. They have not done so, and for that - and other legal wrongs - they can indeed be held to account." It also calls the claims made in the D.A.s' motion "breathtaking," noting that less than 0.2% of the approximately 1,000 sexual assaults reported annually in the county "proceed to finality" on criminal charges.

Ultimately, the suit seeks an injunction ordering each defendant to properly train and supervise employees handling sexual assault cases: require and enforce trauma-informed approaches; submit, test, and analyze all sexual assault kits obtained by (or sent to) law enforcement; offer survivors a timeline for when they can expect their sexual assault kit to be tested; begin prosecuting cases without DNA evidence; and a string of other initiatives. Myers reiterated that the case is not about the prosecution of individual assailants, but a systemwide change that offers women rape survivors the same respect and dignity given to men who survive rape as well as victims of other violent crimes. - Sarah Marloff

RENAME AUSTIN? NOT LIKELY.

No, Austin isn't changing its name. Even though the New York Post informed its readers that "Austin considers renaming city over ties to slavery," and Newsweek wrote "Austin Considering Renaming City to Depart from Confederate History," and the UK's Daily Mail went with "Austin considers renaming the city" ... contrary to the headlines, this city isn't getting a name change or even considering one right now.

So what's the real story? City Council passed a resolution in October tasking the city's Equity Office with identifying cityowned Confederate monuments and memorials and how to remove, replace, or rename them. The city has made progress: In April, Council voted to rename Robert E. Lee Road to honor Azie Morton, the first African-American U.S. treasurer, and scrap Jeff Davis Avenue for Will Holland, a former Travis County commissioner who was once a slave. The office partnered with other groups including archivists with the Austin History Center and spent months reviewing other markers around town.

Last Thursday the office released the full set of its findings, which include two lists high-priority, immediate recommendations for Council; and a lower-priority list with no direct recommendations, requiring "more analysis." That second list includes markers that were not "explicitly Confederate and/or Civil War related but were within the spirit of the resolution representing segregation, racism, and/ or slavery." The renaming of Austin is tucked away on that lower-priority list and is joined by renaming **Stephen F. Austin Drive** and the Austin Recreation Center. Austin fought to defend slavery in spite of Mexico's effort to ban the practice, and believed slave labor to be "indispensable" for Texas' economy. He also believed that if slaves were emancipated they would turn into "vagabonds, a nuisance and a menace."

Brion Oaks, the city's chief equity officer, calls the second list more of an "awareness piece Everyone is saying we're trying to change Austin's name, but that's not the case - we are responding to a request from Council, who asked us to do this research and provide this data." he told me. "At the end of the day, any name change has to

come from Council action and at this point in time, Council has not made any decision." (There is also no timeline for Council to make any decision.)

Seven street names showed up on the highpriority list: Littlefield Street; Tom Green Street; Sneed Cove; Reagan Hill Drive; Dixie Drive; Plantation Road; and Confederate Avenue. The renamings are anticipated to cost about \$6,000 and the new monikers should fall to the council member who represents the district containing the street, the report suggests. Four historical markers also made the immediate action list, including Confederate leader **Jefferson Davis**' marker on South Congress; these require approval from the Travis County Historical Commission and Texas Historical Commission.


The second, lengthier list includes some of the city's most high-profile place names: Barton Springs, Pease Park, Bouldin Creek, Waller Creek, Duval Street, Burnet Road, Lamar Boulevard, and Hancock Drive. (The scope encompassed only city-owned property, so Confederate memorials at the Capitol, UT, federally protected buildings, and schools weren't included.)

Oaks said the office has faced some negative backlash, especially complaints that the city would be trying to "erase or change" history (a common refrain among the bigoted or ignorant when Confederate markers are renamed). Oaks' office - composed of a racially diverse staff - has been accused of being communists or ultra-liberals, and have been told to "go back" where they came from. But Oaks sees the report as an important task, and one that helps grant those previously shut out of decision-making a chance to be part of the dialogue.

"It is essential to acknowledge that societal values are fluid, and they can be and are different today compared to when our city made decisions to name and/or place these Confederate symbols in our community," he wrote in the memo. "It is also important to acknowledge that nearly all monuments to the Confederacy and its leaders were erected without a true democratic process. People of color often had no voice and no opportunity to raise concerns about the city's decision to honor Confederate leaders." - Mary Tuma







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PRECOURT GETS DOWN TO THE NITTY-GRITTY

After four weeks of negotiations, representatives from the city and Precourt Sports Ventures have agreed to a set of terms for a potential deal to bring the Columbus Crew to Austin. Highlights of the revised deal include an increase in the rent paid for use of the city-owned McKalla Place site from \$1 per year to \$550,000 per year, beginning in the sixth year of the deal. (PSV would still forgo paying property taxes on the land.) Eight acres of the site would be devoted to green and open space available to the public year-round, with an additional acre reserved for affordable housing. Although the new terms don't require PSV to pay for the construction of that housing, PSV is still committed to contributing funds to local housing nonprofit Foundation Communities.

The \$550,000 in rent comes after skeptics of the deal called for PSV to pay more for land that a previous appraisal had valued at nearly \$30 million. PSV's Austin-based lobbyist Richard Suttle said the rent would help offset costs incurred by the city in improving off-site infrastructure (estimated by city staff to be about \$5 million, not including \$13 million for a new MetroRail station) and public safety needs during events held at the stadium. But the city would also be required to deposit \$437,500 in years six and seven of the initial term into a "Capital Repairs Reserve Fund" (and then \$125,000 each year for the life of the deal), while PSV would deposit \$125,000 annually into the same fund. Critics of the deal noted that the required contributions from the city would virtually cancel out the rent payments from PSV, but city staff said they negotiated higher rent based on city investment into the reserve fund.

Notably, a "non-relocation agreement" aimed at preventing the team from abandoning the city and the \$200 million stadium during the term of the lease (now 20 years, with options for renewal in 10-year increments) is mentioned in the term sheet. Specifics for how the clause would be enforced are not mentioned, however. Suttle said Monday that those details - along with other specifics relating to the lease agreement and contracts set up with to-beestablished entities controlling the team - would be settled by a new deadline, Oct. 9.

Suttle stressed that the fall date did not mean the city had another two months to continue negotiations with PSV. "We did a very detailed and elaborate term sheet that's heavily negotiated," he said. "On Aug. 9, Council should vote on the term sheet and authorize the city manager to negotiate documents that are consistent with the term sheet." Suttle said the vote scheduled for City Council's Aug. 9 meeting would be critical to showing the MLS bosses that the city is committed to bringing a team here, which would allow PSV to move forward with plans to play the 2019 season in Austin, as well as begin spending money on stadium development.

But questions from skeptical members of the dais remain. Leslie Pool said Tuesday that she saw the revised terms as still being a "massive giveaway" to a for-profit business. She said the increase in rent wouldn't have much impact for taxpayers, because PSV would still avoid paying property taxes. "The value to the community is not there in any appreciable, actualized way," Pool said. "The taxpayers of Austin are still subsidizing a wealthy man's sports team." Despite her continued skepticism, Pool reiterated that her position is not antisoccer - she's looking for a deal "that is best for the city, not the soccer team." She said she intends to vote no on Aug. 9.

Pool also said she's working on adding an agenda item to the Aug. 9 meeting that would call for an up-or-down vote on taking

the entire deal out of the hands of City Council and putting it before voters as a ballot measure. If that effort fails on the dais, the seasoned petitioners at **IndvAustin** are prepared to make the stadium deal their new cause. Group organizer Linda Curtis said Monday that she'd be watching discussion at this Wednesday's Council meeting to see if there's enough support among CMs for a ballot initiative to make a petition drive unnecessary, so the group might not "pull the trigger on a drive last-minute." PSV reps have said that if this becomes a ballot measure, it would "kill the deal," because of the tight timeline MLS has pushed for if Precourt is to move the team.

Modifying the deal terms to include additional funding for Capital Metro emerged as a key point after Wednesday's special called Council meeting. On Tuesday night, Delia Garza posted on the Council message board calling for \$3 million in new funding from PSV - plus a \$1 surcharge on

tickets and the allocation of \$2 million from rent payments - for the transit authority to use for enhancing existing bus lines, building a new rail station, or "how they see best supports the agency." Ann Kitchen and Greg Casar agreed with a push for more Cap Metro funding, but Suttle said it would be tough for PSV to find the money. "Basically, the city already wrung every dollar out of us they could," he said Wednesday. "We could reallocate the money, but there isn't room in the budget for new funds."

Meanwhile, alternate options for McKalla have begun rolling in. On Tuesday, Capella Capital Partners proposed two plans to the city for a mixed-use development on the site, and on Wednesday Whitfield-Chen published a website that features that group's mixed-use plans. Council will meet Tuesday to talk about those options (and potentially others like them), prior to next Thursday's vote. - Austin Sanders

ELECTION NOTES: NEW NAMES FOR AISD, COUNCIL

 Pio Renteria has another challenger in District 3. 27-year-old Justin Jacobson filed his campaign treasurer appointment forms last week. A multigenerational Austinite, Jacobson currently works in the restaurant industry, but said his passion lies in politics.

Jacobson has worked for a slew of political candidates of late, including Bernie Sanders, Wendy Davis, Celia Israel, and Mandy Dealey, who ran in D10 in 2014. He's also spent time with the local branch of the Stonewall Democrats working to make their candidate endorsement process more inclusive to trans folks and queer people of color.

A self-described "queer millennial" who "gets intersectionality." Jacobson said he believes Austin is capable of grander conversations on inclusivity and nuance. He's committed to fighting for a greater diversity of affordable housing, more robust renter protections (he rents), and historic preservation, particularly for the East Cesar Chavez neighborhood. Jacobson believes

Council's current dais is caught up in a "false choice" argument between preservationists and urbanists, and he'd like to see more open-mindedness and more "good faith olive branches" to make land use decisions less divisive. He cites transportation as another key issue, and he's committed to reaching out to nearby cities and suburbs like Round Rock and Leander to further incentivize (and fund) additional light rail routes.

Jacobson expects to have a campaign kickoff within the next month and said he plans to run a "very crunchy granola grassroots campaign." - Sarah Marloff

 District 1 voters have five candidates to consider, now that East Austin native and longtime state employee Reedy Spigner has entered the race. Spigner – grandson of noted black East Austin physician James Murphy Holloway, whose wife, Mildred Coleman Holloway, co-founded Black Austin Democrats - is perhaps best known for his 2016 battle with **Ora**

Houston, who intervened to delay Spigner from getting a demolition permit for his home on 22nd Street Houston lives two doors down from that home, which he eventually succeeded in selling. Spigner, who now lives in D1's northeastern corner, told me that if elected, he'll focus on engaging with the needs of the entire district, and not just the south end. - Nina Hernandez

- It doesn't look as if Lewis Conway Jr.'s record as a convicted felon will be an issue for his candidacy in City Council District 1. Any legal challenge would need to come from one of his opponents; we've asked each of the four he's up against, and they've each indicated that they aren't planning that sort of attack.
- · Arati Singh will seek a spot in District 9 of the Austin ISD Board of Trustees, making her the first candidate to file for the seat vacated by former board president Kendall Pace, who stepped down in May. Speaking on Tuesday, Singh made veiled reference to the allegations of backroom dealmaking that ended Pace's tenure. Singh stressed the merits of "good governance" and increasing transparency in the board's

decision making, and reasoned that if the board were upfront about how it made critical decisions, the public would be more understanding of "hard decisions" like consolidating schools or cutting programs.

Singh has worked as an education consultant for two decades in Texas and Washington, D.C., and she spent two years teaching at a bilingual school in South Texas. Singh has also been active in PTA groups, belonging to the political advocacy arms of the Austin **Council of PTAs** and the **Texas PTA**. While she was president of the Oak Hill Elementary PTA in 2011, the group received the National PTA School of Excellence Award, in part for Singh's work to better integrate parents of Spanish-speaking students into PTA affairs. She said her time on the Oak Hill PTA - a Title I school would make her uniquely qualified to help communities AISD has historically struggled to support. "What we really need right now in the district is somebody who's going to show respect, compassion, and empathy for everyone, but in particular, our low-income communities," Singh said. - Austin Sanders

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You Go Your Way

A shuttered satellite office, and a change in direction for the Texas Civil Rights Project

This spring, the board of trustees for the Texas Civil Rights Project, a community lawyering organization known for taking cases others wouldn't, voted to close the nonprofit's satellite office in El Paso, which had served that community for more than a decade. The group told the El Paso Times that it had only been able to retain one attorney in the office over the last year, and so the move made fiscal sense moving forward. But, a representative insisted, the move would not mean any service reductions in the El Paso area.

That didn't stop invested parties in the West Texas city from worrying. County Judge Ruben John Vogt, who wasn't aware of the decision until the newspaper called him for comment, told the Times, "It's always difficult to see an organization that has done such good work leave a community, especially a community where there is always need." One of the office's former directors, attorney Briana Stone, had stronger words in a Facebook post. She said news of the closure "knocked the wind out of me and I actually had to pull my car over to the side of the road."

Stone, who worked for the organization from 2006 until 2011, also posted a photo on Facebook, of a mural painted at the shuttered office. It features famous civil rights leaders, including Martin Luther King Jr., Cesar Chavez, and Texas voting rights advocate Lawrence Nixon, and stands as a symbol of the "revolutionary spirit" already lighting up the region when the TCRP set up shop. "We were welcomed and immediately warmed by its flame, but we didn't light the fire," wrote Stone. "If anything, our work was bolstered by the committed and courageous advocates in the El Paso region." She predicted that TCRP will suffer more for having cut itself off from this direct line to the community.

"In El Paso, the fight for racial, social, and economic justice will continue with or without" TCRP.

"REBEL WITH MANY CAUSES"

Stone wasn't the only former TCRP attorney to be disheartened by the news. The group's founder and longtime executive director, Jim Harrington, who established the organization in 1990, issued a press release shortly after the announcement, decrying the closure as a result of mismanagement by Mimi Marziani, who took over after his retirement. Harrington contends that he left the organization in 2015 with \$1.2 million in the bank. "The really sad thing about this is this was an office that we put there because the community asked for it, and it did tremendous work," Harrington told me in an interview on May 8. "There's obviously a concentration on Austin, to the detriment of the community. And it's really alarming."

Harrington opened the El Paso office after a 2005 lawsuit filed by TCRP and the Texas RioGrande Legal Aid against the El Paso Police Department. Its officers beat Montwood High School students who were protesting school policy, and the lawsuit resulted in new training procedures for El Paso PD. The office also sued the area sheriff's department for "unconstitutionally

"If you're going to cut back anywhere, cut back in Austin," said Harrington, who has had little to no contact with the organization since his departure. (There are 15 attorneys in the Austin office.) "God knows there's plenty of people here who can do stuff. But you don't have anybody in El Paso."

Though Harrington is gone from TCRP, a reminder of him still exists in the Austin office's foyer. Etched onto a square piece of clay reads: "For Jim Harrington: Great Lawyer, Lousy Golfer." It's hardly surprising to anybody who knows the once reluctant lawyer that he would be bitterly opposing his old organization's new direction. After all, the TCRP itself was born out of a philosophical divide.

As reported by the Chronicle's Erica Barnett in 1998, in a story headlined "Rebel With Many Causes," Harrington started the TCRP after splitting from the Texas Civil Liberties Union. Harrington told Barnett at the time that the TCLU resisted his efforts to unionize, but other involved parties insisted "their problem was his personality." A former board member said of Harrington: "If you have a direction you want to go in and he disagrees with it, he won't have anything to do with you; you're no longer his friend. There's no gray area."

But that's just one side of Harrington, who now spends his time advocating for Norman and Sims elementary schools. His dogged, grassroots style won him points even from some of his detractors. As UT Law professor Pat Hazel put it to Barnett: "Saints could be a pretty big pain in the ass, too."

TIME OF TRANSITION

By his faults or better angels, however you choose to describe Harrington, his TCRP successor comes from a much different law in New York City, Marziani in 2014 relocated to work as legal director of the Wendy Davis gubernatorial campaign. She's currently a professor at UT School of Law, and has also taught at NYU's Wagner School of Public Service.

When Harrington stepped aside, people within the nonprofit community encouraged Marziani to take the reins. She acknowledged that Harrington's departure has been a big transition, but said the changes are the result of a strategic plan the group spent last year crafting. Whereas TCRP under Harrington was more of a hybrid model, blending statewide impact litigation with on-the-ground legal aid, the group under Marziani has been more focused on the former, through three particular areas of advocacy: racial and economic justice, criminal justice reform, and voting rights, her specialty. Immediately, anyone familiar with Harrington could see where this would put the two executives at odds. Harrington has long been a critic of the American Civil Liberties Union, which he faulted for operating "in a vacuum" and not on the ground, as he'd crafted the TCRP. Marziani's operation is closer to the ACLU's model than Harrington had envisioned.

Marziani agrees that closing the El Paso office was a difficult decision, but one that she believes will ultimately allow the organization to be more nimble. "It's about lawyers not sitting in an ivory chamber somewhere coming up with litigation," she said, but rather engaging those groups and pursuing quality over quantity when it comes to litigation. The organization will never have the resources to staff attorneys throughout the state, she said, but from Austin it can work with groups on the ground to maintain that statewide coverage.





Another criticism of the new leadership is that TCRP lost funding from the Texas Access to Justice Foundation, which among other things helped TCRP in its work with veterans. Marziani said that the funding was stripped due to political backlash against the organization from the Legislature, other sources have insisted that was because the TCRP moved out of the direct delivery of legal services. Texas Access to Justice confirmed that in a statement, saying limited funding makes organizations that provide direct delivery of legal services a priority.

Beyond those fiscal and philosophical concerns, TCRP is also grappling with the recent resignation of one of its board members, Dallas attorney Mandy Price, due to allegations of racism she encountered while on the board. In her resignation letter last November, Price wrote that it was a heart-wrenching decision to leave an organization she had served for five years. Among other initiatives, Price helped orga-

nize Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals clinics and recruit attorneys to help Dreamers fill out the program application. But "given that TCRP is dedicated to social justice issues such as the elimination of workplace discrimination, I was a bit surprised to have to tackle these same issues inside our organization." She described "odd resistance" to her ideas

from board colleagues, who she said regularly asked her to defend her competence and recommendations.

When she raised concerns, she "was told that I was wrong," and was simply not focusing on the right issues as a board member. Unfortunately, the issues didn't end with just Price. "Unwarranted doubts have also been raised about the ability of prospective board members of color to raise money or attend board meetings," she wrote.

Marziani said she has "spoken to Mandy at length, repeatedly, about her concerns," and believes "the vast majority of the board has, as well." She said the TCRP takes Price's allegations "very, very seriously," and that she "only wish[es] her the best." Following Price's resignation, Marziani said the organization "leaned into" diversity in both hiring and internal training processes.

TCRP now has a Diversity and Inclusion Committee that has decision-making authority over policy, outreach, and hiring. The staff and board of directors have undergone diversity training.

TCRP's biggest undertaking right now is its involvement in helping reunite children separated from their families by the Trump administration's immigration policies. As Marziani explained in June in testimony before the U.S. Senate, TCRP interviewed nearly 400 parents separated from their children, the overwhelming majority of whom were fleeing poverty, corruption, and gang violence. At the end of May, TCRP and the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights filed an emergency request on behalf of five families "requesting reunification and seeking an end to the policy of separating children from their parents systematically."

The group's executive director was in the

trenches with her colleagues leading up to the government's deadline to reunite families last month. Marziani has continued work that started prior to her tenure, including a successful suit against El Paso for operating a debtor's prison, as well as against Texas for voting machine access for people with disabilities and air conditioning in Texas prisons.

Marziani acknowledged Harrington's claim that he left the organization with \$1.2 million, but said the group has since increased that reserve funding in case of a natural disaster, or unexpected crises like the family separations - which TCRP hadn't accounted for in this year's budget.

Meanwhile, she said the El Paso office building TCRP just vacated will go to a partner organization, at a significant loss to TCRP. The group's communications director, Zenén Jaimes Pérez, said the office closing "doesn't mean we're not doing work in El Paso." Marziani said speculation that any of the group's other offices are headed for the same fate are ill-founded. "We're not going anywhere," she said. "We are not leaving El Paso."

Expect Harrington, from his perch in East Austin, to hold her to that, however he can.



lone spotlight hits the stage. Into it steps Frank Washington, 31. After a pause so long it's maddening, he begins to speak - undoubtedly - from a place of personal truth. "It's hard to love a man that continually berates you, calls you fag, sissy, punk, queer ... but we do." Some audience members shift in their seats, while others lean in, hanging on Washington's every word. "We fight for you, yet you refuse to acknowledge your black brothers who are gay, bi, trans, or ... rather, non-straight. Beautiful. Black. Men. We're just like you" This piece, titled Their Own Receive Them Not, is one small slice of a larger performance by the Mahogany Project, Austin's most prolific black queer men's theatre collective. Unrestrained and unapologetic, Washington and others from a long-silenced community are taking the stage to speak their piece.

As with most thought-provoking live performance works, the Mahogany Project's stage show defies easy categorization. A charged combination of poetry, prose, and ensemble pieces, the Project's annual productions (or "volumes," as they're called) can perhaps best be defined as the intimate - sometimes erratic - onstage manifestation of a historically marginalized group's innermost feelings and frustrations. In addition to creating a communal safe space for its members, the Project exists as a platform to educate audiences in the many nuances associated with living as a queer person of color. "Many people have an idea of what 'black and gay' is, but they don't have the true essence of it," says London Pe'Rez, 29, a five-year veteran of the Project, and the group's sole trans member. "Our show is proof that 'black and gay' is an umbrella, encompassing many different shapes, sizes, and personalities."

Penned by the performers, the Project's pieces draw inspiration from interviews conducted within the community, conversations between friends, and, most commonly, personal experiences. The subjects they've touched on over the years include love, sex, gender, homophobia, racism, objectification, and intersectionality, to name a few.

Though the Project was officially founded in 2012 by creative partners Joe Anderson Jr., 31, and Will Lyons, 33, its roots can be traced back to 2011, when the duo began hosting weekly gatherings for queer men of color at their small North Austin apartments. Dubbed the "Sweet-Tea Discussions," these casual hangouts filled a crucial gap in Austin's queer community. "We wanted a safe space, to be honest," reflects Lyons, "to discuss all things dating, relationships, sex, and coming out."

For Anderson, these discussions made apparent just how restricted black queer voices were within society at large. "We realized how wide a range of experiences we all lived, but the media only portrayed us as the effem-

inate friend or the thug. You never saw two black men in a relationship, the friendships, the dating, or the intersections of being black in a queer space, or queer in a black space. We needed to humanize those occasions."

Since then, the Mahogany Project has grown into a close-knit collective of 10 area creatives who make up one of Austin's most unabashedly candid LGBTQ voices. Each year, the group returns to the Dougherty Arts

Center stage to kick off Austin Pride week. It's here that the Project unveils the latest volume in its continuing series. Each volume features fresh material loosely tied together by an overarching concept. Past volumes have focused on such themes as body image, revolu-

tion, and dynasty. "Each volume's writing process begins with solidifying the big picture," says Anderson. "What do we want the audience to take from this? What point are we trying to make?' From there, we build our show." Come Aug. 3, the Project will unveil its latest volume: *Joy*.

As anyone who's patronized a Mahogany Project show is aware, a volume dedicated to joy is cause for celebration in itself. Reflecting the experiences lived by the men onstage, the content of a Mahogany Project show isn't always lighthearted or easy to digest. It's not uncommon for audiences to experience pieces about suicide, HIV/AIDS, and police brutality, all in an hour. "Joy as a show will be a departure," Anderson says. "With past shows, we've gone from heavy piece to heavy piece, because it happens. People in our community deal with hardships back to back. There are no breaks."

If the truths Mahogany Project speaks can

be tough for audiences to hear, the strength required to relive them is herculean. "Performing in the Mahogany Project is like ripping off a scab every single time you perform," says Anderson. "Each performance means experiencing those same emotions you went

through when you got cut. You relive that trauma in order to save someone else's life." Anderson isn't alone in feeling this responsibility. Pe'Rez reveals, "I've had plenty of times where I'd think, 'I can't do this anymore. I'm tired of making myself vulnerable.' But you have to because you never know who it may benefit."

While being in the Mahogany Project is an emotionally draining gig, there is validation to be found in the healing dialogues opened with each performance. In keeping with the

Project's goal of education, each volume closes with a talkback, where audience members of all backgrounds can ask questions, express opinions, or simply show their appreciation. "I'll always remember the woman who came to our show looking for guidance after her son told her he wanted to transition," says Pe'Rez. "Being able to explain to her the correct practices, the correct skills, who to reach out to for help – just how to be a supportive family member – was indescribable."

Though the general reaction to the Project's work has been positive, that's not to say its willingness to foster dialogue hasn't attracted controversy. "There was a time an audience member asked us how we felt about going to hell," recalls Anderson. "For me, that was an opportunity to open a discussion about the privilege that comes with even asking a question like that - with feeling like you can ask another person how they feel about going to hell and see nothing wrong with that. For Frank, it was also an opportunity to discuss his own relationship with religion, how he and many other queer folks also go to church and believe in the same God that audience member believed in."

Perhaps teachable moments like these are what make a show centered around joy a milestone for the Project. Clearly, there's no shortage of work to be done, hearts to warm, and ignorance to extinguish. Fortunately, the ever-growing sense of fraternity within the Mahogany Project, and, as a result, Austin's greater LGBTQ community, means the collective resolve to face these challenges has never been stronger. "It's easy to feel isolated by the larger community," says Lyons. "But when you feel like you belong to something greater than yourself, our hope is you can manage your daily struggles, because in times of crisis you have someone to call on."

This sense of belonging is resonating with the Project's members as they've been reflecting on the meaning of joy – which, not surprisingly, takes on various definitions depending on who you ask. "Joy is knowing that if another black trans woman were to step into our group at the beginning of their transition process, they'd have the same level of love and support that I did," says Pe'Rez. "Because, for me, joy is finding peace within yourself."

For Anderson, who has seen the Project grow from a small weekly discussion to one of the city's most powerful tools for LGBTQ education, joy is the end result of six hardfought years of progress and enlightenment. "There's a movement currently happening in Austin. It's been happening, and now it's finally at the forefront. It's time to celebrate being out and being ourselves. Because if we don't, who else will?"

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Elvis has been sighted in Austin. Not the early Elvis of Sun Records and not the late Elvis of the Vegas Strip, but the Elvis no one likes to talk about: the

middle Elvis of Hollywood, the star of all those cheesy Sixties rom-coms in which he played a devil-maycare deckhand/rodeo rider/racecar driver who also happened to be a

terrific singer and whose prickly romance with some fetching, feisty lass (Ann-Margret/Shelley Fabares/ Nancy Sinatra) would be interrupted by a carefully calibrated series of songs (defined by lyricist Jerry Leiber as "three ballads,

one medium-tempo [number], one up-tempo, and one break blues boogie"). Hit the Hillside for the 60th annual 7ilker Summer Musical and you, too, can see this least-respected of the King's incarnations, and that's not a bad thing, not by a long shot.

For in penning the book for the Elvis jukebox musical All Shook Up, writer Joe DiPietro knew how cheesecloth-thin the plots in Presley's pictures were, and he had some fun with them here, tweaking their tropes of love at first sight, romantic rivalries, Elvis' sidekick, and the King's incomparable cool factor for comic effect. Sporting a name lifted from Blue Hawaii, our Elvis proxy Chad has a forced layover in an unnamed Midwestern town thanks to a plot device swiped from Roustabout (a motorcycle in need of repair). That allows enough time

for fetching, feisty Natalie to want Chad for her teddy bear, for Chad to start itchin' like a man on a fuzzy tree over museum caretaker

Sandra, and for a whole daisy chain of attractions to erupt among the otherwise humdrum townsfolk. To complicate their passionate pursuits further, DiPietro mixes in an interracial romance and some Shakespearean cross-dressing

- since Chad won't give Natalie a second look, she becomes "Ed" as a way to get next to him – and before you can say "Twelfth Night," Sandra falls for Ed and Chad starts having feels for a guy like he's never had before. It's considerably more convoluted than anything

Elvis had to handle in Clambake or Tickle Me, but it's also considerably more playful and fun to follow than anything in those pictures.

Taking his cue from the script, Zilker Theatre Productions Artistic Director J. Robert Moore makes playful this show's watchword. He's encouraged his actors to embrace their stock characters and the schtick that goes with them, the result being an ensemble of lively, good-humored performers who never shy away from a gag, no matter how corny. Just note the enthusiasm with which every actor whose character is suddenly smitten bursts into song – the same song: "One night with you!" Or the way everyone calls Chad "Roustabout" like it's his name. ("What're you doing here, Roustabout?") As Chad, Andrew Cannata steers clear of most of the King's obvious signifiers (the lip curl, the drawl, the hair combing), though he does give his pelvis the Elvis workout. More importantly, he sends up the ego of the rebel who knows how cool he is; Cannata's Chad is just full enough of himself to be funny, which makes losing his cool over Ed all the funnier.

Equally comic is Heather Capello in her discomfort as Ed being chased by Sandra (Josey Pickett, working Ann-Margret's Viva Las Vegas territory, but with the smarts and glamour of Christina Hendricks in Mad Men). Capello's balance of yearning for Chad and alarm at Sandra is just what you'd hope for in a disguised Viola in Twelfth Night, which makes sense since she's played that role before. But her Natalie is also so adorable that we see why guy pal Dennis is carrying a torch for her. Between the unrequited love and the sidekick comedy, Dennis is a plum role, and Joey Banks draws all the juice from it in a sly, delightful turn. More forceful is Sue Breland's decency-obsessed mayor, who's as subtle as the bullhorn she bellows through and who could stare down Ethel Merman. But it's spot on for the part, and when she launches into "Devil in Disguise" with a pink electric guitar and full angel wings, Breland rocks the Hillside.

Which reminds me, Presley purists: Don't expect to hear Elvis' songs performed here as the King did them. This being a jukebox musical (accent on "musical"), they've been arranged to sound more like show tunes. Still, music director Lyn Koenning and her band succeed in giving these old favorites some appealing new sounds. Listening to Michelle Alexander infuse "There's Always Me" with a shot of soul and Cannata and Jessica O'Brien turn up the gospel power on "If I Can Dream" are joys to be lingered on. Indeed, add them to the other pleasures in Zilker's All Shook Up, and you may wish your motorcycle had broken down, Roustabout, so you were forced to stay here longer.



A raucous concert-going crowd rose to its feet as one following the last strains of the final movement of National Geographic's Symphony for Our World, performed impeccably by the Austin Symphony Orchestra and Chorus Austin under the assured and engaging direction of guest conductor Kelly Corcoran.

Just witnessed, a feast for the eyes and a tug on the conscience. For the eyes (and heart), video and photographic footage of Earth's glorious animal and floral life shot in the most remote parts of our planet, featuring awe-inspiring and intimate interactions

between species a-hunting, breeding, feeding, and playing. The breathtaking natural history footage was underscored by classical music: excerpts from works by Maurice Ravel and a newly minted "symphony" composed by Austin Fray and Andrew Chris-

tie, two members of the Bleeding Fingers Music composer collective.

The conscience-tugging, for which this particular Austin audience didn't really require the nudge, came in the form of brief videotaped entreaties by Nat Geo explorers and photographers not to take our planet for granted. That said, it bears constant repeating: Earth is under assault from man. Scientists have named this the Anthropocene epoch, the period when man's impact on the planet achieved measurable effect, including our deleterious impact on Earth's climate. Yet, per the explorers' messages, there is still hope, still time to stave off inevitable catastrophic change. This multimedia production is a noble effort in support of that cause: Save the Earth.

Jason Michael Paul, producer and creative entrepreneur behind this collaboration with

National Geographic Partners, enthuses that the future of live classical music lies in such multimedia events - combinations of onscreen imagery and orchestral performance to help negotiate the gap between music and audience. It's a road already well-traveled, with orchestras performing live scores for films, for example - three weeks ago, the string quartet invoke accompanied the animated feature The Adventures of Prince Achmed as part of the 2018 Austin Chamber Music Festival. Given the energetic response by the all-ages audience on

Saturday night, Symphony for Our World certainly serves as a valuable entry point, a visually stunning gateway drug for classical musicgoers of the future.

The score by composers Fray and Christie is adequate, suitably dramatic for the ran-

dom visuals their music accompanies without being particularly challenging. Working more from an outline than a recognizable symphonic structure. Symphony for Our World is a collage in five movements, starting in the sea and progressing skyward via shore, land, and mountain. Each movement is subdivided into commercial-length vignettes that underscore stunning video of life in each milieu. You'll hear the same sounds accompanying opening credits to prestige television dramas or montages from NBC's coverage of the Tour de France.

It's a comfortable, familiar soundtrack. The real stars of the show are Earth's endangered species. Though if we get too comfortable, 100 years from now this piece will be a reminder of all that was lost from a once-vibrant planet, a Requiem for Our World. - Robi Polgar relationships with their husbands, lovers, and children. "XAVIER **SCHIPANI: CHASING** DESIRE Lora Reynolds Gallery, 360 Nueces #50,

www.lorareynolds.com Through Sept. 1 "History may never have seen another time when the idea of masculinity has been in deeper crisis," Xavier Schipani

writes in the notes for his show at Lora Revnolds Gallery. In "Chasing Desire," Schipani probes

the crisis and history of masculinity by enlarging men to heroic scale, casting them in classically athletic bodies, and then piling them in orgiastic knots. In a mural spanning the length of the room, humongous nude men tug on two sides of a knotted rope. Elsewhere in the space, men tug on themselves and one another.

Tucked behind a dividing wall is a three-stall bathroom, which, with all the stall doors closed, looks, maybe, purely functional. There are sinks and a mirror, three urinals to the side of the stall. But open any of the doors and inside is a bacchanal like those on the surrounding walls. Stepping into the enclosed area becomes more confronting, with men contorted in various positions seeming to proposition you directly.

This is not Schipani's first use of the bathroom as an installation setting. Recently, he collaborated with Jill Soloway and Refinery29 in participation with the media site's 29Rooms series. In his contribution, Schipani filled a bathroom with graffitied slogans and doodles, all centered on similar themes of gender, sexuality, and identity. At Lora Reynolds, Schipani's exploration of these themes and the space develops a tighter focus and more graceful coherence. The space doesn't seem gritty or unclean, but sterilized somehow despite the explicit depictions on the stalls. At a time when the bathroom has been weaponized against the queer community, this reclaiming of the vulnerable space is fantastic and effective.

Voted Best Muralist in The Austin Chronicle's Best of Austin 2016 Readers Poll, Schipani



uses a mural painting technique that is confident and punchy. The mélange of flesh tones, in simple silhouetted shapes, feels at once fresh and trendy. His layered shapes, clean lines, and pools of color create and maintain visual interest as you trace limbs and faces in couplings, or throuplings, or quadrouplings, or

On a smaller scale and in a separate room, Schipani's portrait series, We're Still Here, features busts drawn in colored pencil and acrylic. The portraits are subtle, realistic depictions of members of the LGBTO community from Schipani's life at his time of transitioning, people Schipani identifies as "transcestors." The medium is one that Schipani is perhaps less comfortable with, and timidity comes across in the work, a contrast from his boldness with mural painting. The subjects appear plaintive and placid, drawn in ghostly shades of gray-blue. An exception is Self-Portrait, which is done in color, Schipani's green eyes peer at the viewer as he looks straight ahead from an ovoid face. As an openly trans man, Schipani is clear about the personal nature of his interest in masculinity.

By drawing from literally antiquated gender norms and situating his muscle men alongside Hellenic motifs. Schipani seems to be playfully arguing that the expectations society places on gender are never static, specifically those pressures surrounding masculinity. While the present toxicity of these expectations is unignorable, Schipani presents a surreal utopia where, perhaps, the crisis of masculinity can spark a beautiful, rollicking good - Melany Jean



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

The Tree Sculpture Tour in Galveston is the lemonade from the lemons left on the island by Hurricane Ike in 2008.

The wind and rain did plenty of damage to the island, but a tidal surge covered the city in muck and saltwater. Months after the storm it became apparent that many of the trees would not survive the salt poisoning. The canopies of the dead trees were removed, leaving four-foot to eight-foot stumps.

Where some saw unsightly reminders of the hurricane, others saw an artist's canvas. Paid by homeowners and civic organizations, three artists went to work creating art where once stood scars from the storm. More than 35 of the sculptures grace lawns, with the largest concentration in the East End Historical District on the edge of downtown between Postoffice Street and Sealy Avenue. Local artist Earl Jones did a re-creation of the "Tall Ship ELISSA Figurehead."

Dale Lewis, an artist from Indiana, created "Great Dane" to commemorate a homeowner's dog, plus at least 10 others. Jim Phillips of Houston did seven of the sculptures on the tour including "Tin Man & Toto" at the house where **King Vidor**, a director on *The Wizard of Oz*, was born.

All the sculptures are amazing, but one of the most beautiful is by Jones, of native son **Jack Johnson**, the Galveston boxer. The figure flows out of the ground in a small park at 4403 N. Live Oaks Circle. The Tree Sculpture Tour in Galveston is self-guided, but please

SalvaTex

A FOOD TRAILER MAKING SALVADORAN TEX-MEX NAILS IT by Emily Beyda

Salvadoran food was a tradition in my house growing up. Every Sunday, my dad would stop by the old ladies who slung pupusas over on Hollywood and Vine in Los Angeles and pick up a stack of bean and cheese pupusas with slaw and crema. The combination of that crunchy cabbage with the soft savoriness of masa is Proustian for me, and profoundly reassuring. So, of course, when I saw the lines of trucks advertising homemade Salvadoran Tex-Mex cuisine parked outside a trailer on Airport, I knew I was duty-bound to check it out.

The first thing you should know about SalvaTex is that it might be a little difficult to visit. They're closed on Sundays (good for them, frankly) and when we visited during the week we found their window shut because they had gone home early. Most days they're only open until 5pm, so unless you're taking your pupusas to go, you're going to end up sitting in the full summer sun eating hot melted cheese. You may or may not get bit by the fire ants that, when we visited, were lying in wait under a back table. The second thing you should know is that it's worth it. SalvaTex exemplifies the kind of home cooking that makes so many of Austin's trailers great. The

SALVATEX kind and cheery, and their lipstick 1196 Airport and hair is somehow flawless in 737/708-3119 the blistering steam heat of the trailer. They are almost maternal in their enthusiasm for getting their customers fed. And the pupusas? The pupusas, my dudes, are nothing short of incredible.

ladies who run it are unfailingly

It's hot (of course it is), so before we decide on pupusas, my friend and I spring for a couple of aguas frescas. I get a classic horchata, and she goes for watermelon, which I am pleased to discover is surprisingly not too sweet. At its worst, watermelon agua fresca can taste like a melted Jolly Rancher over ice, but this is lightly flavored and refreshing, like a real watermelon squeezed into a glass rather than some artificially flavored imitation. The horchata, on the other hand, is slightly oversweetened, gritty with ground-up rice and spices, but has a lovely strong cinnamon taste, which makes it feel more like a dessert than an appropriate accompaniment for lunch. The

bucket-sized Styrofoam containers they came in were big enough that I had about a gallon to take home with me, and combined with iced coffee, an unexpected bonus.

Refreshed by all that ice, we get down to the business of pupusa sampling. We settle on a classic trio on the recommendation of one of the women in the trailer who struggles to describe what loro actually is: jalapeño, cheese, and bean; pork and cheese; and a loroco and cheese. "It's a vegetable," she says, when we ask. "A flower. It tastes ... I think you just have to try it to know what it tastes like." I can see what she meant when it arrives. Loroco is the edible flower of a climbing vine that grows wild all over Central America. If you, like I was, are expecting this means it has a delicate, floral, squash blossom taste, well, you would be wrong. It has a vaguely medicinal taste, something like a mix of camphor, onion, and the strong minerality of wild oregano. The thing it reminded me of most was the smell in the hayloft in my grandmother's dairy barn, a mixture of the fresh green scent of hay and something wetly animal, dankly alive. A singular taste, to be sure, but not an unpleasant one. It's like nothing I've ever had before, and that

> alone makes it worth trying. The other pupusas were a little more approachable. The jalapeño, cheese, and bean was almost like a classic melty Tex-Mex bean and

cheese burrito in pupusa form, all runny and juicy and savory rich with lard, the pickled jalapeños providing a welcome snap of vinegar heat. The pork and cheese was tender but crispy, with queso blanco oozing out of the cracks in the thick corn dough and going crispy thin on the griddle, clinging rich to the strands of slow roasted pork. All three pupusas came with little plastic bags of slaw as well as two salsas, a smoky red tomato based one and a thin green sauce made from spicy jalapeños and cilantro. The slaw was incredibly spicy and salty, with an intensely slow-burning heat that reminded my lunch date of a Thai green papaya salad. It's a nice accompaniment to the fatty richness of the fillings, but you'll need a pretty big swig of horchata afterward to cool your mouth off.

But it's not all pupusas at SalvaTex. They have homemade tamales with some of the





most delicate masa I've ever had, smooth as custard and delicately flavored with the umami tang of tomato purée. The banana leaf it's wrapped in gives the masa a slightly tannic flavor, with a bitterness that contrasts beautifully with the rich filling of moist poached chicken and potato cubes, just soaking up all that sauce. And then there's the Salvadoran enchilada. For the uninitiated, these are more reminiscent of Mexican tostadas than our Tex-Mex concoctions of soft tortillas wrapped around a savory filling and topped with sauce. In a Salvadoran enchilada, the tortillas (homemade here, and fried alongside the pupusas so they sop up some of that delicious grease) are crispy and fried flat, topped with a protein of your choice (I went with al pastor, savory and citrusy with a thick garlic fug) as well as creamy sauce, cotija cheese,

refried beans, sliced hard-boiled eggs, and a giant pile of chopped tomatoes and iceberg lettuce. This creates an amazing mélange of flavors and textures, the warm chewy meat, the creamy beans and cheese, the super-crispy funnel cake texture of the fried masa. It's like a taco salad died and went to heaven.

As we finished up our lunch, I noticed that pretty much all the orders are to go. Young men rode up on bicycles, families pulled up in minivans, and everyone rolled off with big bags full of Salvadoran deliciousness. Next time, I'm going to do the same: Pupusas are the ultimate picnic food, after all, and what could be better than sipping that massive watermelon agua fresca with your feet in the water of the Colorado? On your way out, leave a big tip and say a little prayer for the sweaty saints frying up all those pupusas. While the food may be heavenly, that trailer looks hotter than hell.

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The Tree of Life

The local mesquite movement started with one man's vision

It started off simply enough: Bake something using a unique ingredient. Who would have thought that such a mundane task would launch a passion project to recover a culturally significant foodstuff that has. over the course of the last century and a half, fallen out of favor?

Back in 2012, Slow Food Austin asked Sandeep Gyawali of Miche Bread to make something for its annual fundraising quiz using a unique ingredient. Competitors would do a blind tasting and try to guess that unique ingredient. "I wanted to do it in good faith with the mission of the organization," says Gyawali. "So, I checked the Ark of Taste, which is the database of heritage foods in danger of extinction and found mesquite [the actual entry on the Ark of Taste is mesquite pod flour] and decided to use that. I went to Whole Foods for mesquite flour, and found a bag of it from Peru. It was surprising to me that there wasn't any Texas mesquite flour available. From

there, it stayed in the back of my mind that there should be a Texas mesquite flour." And that's how the Texas Mesquite Project was born

The English word "mesquite" comes from the Spanish "mezquite," which was borrowed from the Nahuatl "mizguitl." The mesquite tree (what we have here in Texas is known as the honey mesquite; further west, folks use velvet mesquite) was a cornucopia for indigenous people pre-colonization. Members of the Tohono O'odham,

Pima, Apache, Maricopa. and other tribes ground the pods into meal and used it to make bread, or mixed it with water to make a sweet mush. The rest of the tree could be used for textiles and for medicinal purposes. But today, in Texas, mesquite is most closely associated with barbecue.

According Daniel Vaughn, writing for Texas

Monthly, the association of mesquite with barbecue goes back to the post-Civil War era in the Southwest, which gave rise to the cattle ranching industry. Grazing cows helped propagate the trees across the scrubby range, which effectively turned mesquite, a thirsty tree, into a nuisance plant. To combat the problem, in a triumph of midcentury marketing, mesquite became the go-to wood for that "authentic smokehouse" flavor of Texas-style smoked meats.

Today, mesquite occupies 50 to 60 million acres of land in Texas. That's a lot of untapped raw material - and potential for revitalizing an ancient foodstuff beyond the smoker - and there are plenty of good reasons to explore the possibilities.

Chris "Chiltic" Luna, a Phoenix-based ethnobiologist descended from the Guachichil Chichimecas of San Luis Potosí, documents the process of harvesting, storing, and processing mesquite and other native plants. In so doing, he pushes back against the erasure of cultural practices, and recovers indigenous plant knowledge in the process. For Luna, who prefers to add bone broth or berries to mesquite meal for a grits-style breakfast, consuming mesquite is a way to avoid incorporation into the latecapitalist food chain. "One small mesquite tree can give you five gallons of beans, which is enough to feed you for a while," says Luna. "Power structures don't like that, because if you're able to eat off the land, who's going to tax you? If you can go harvest mesquite beans, you don't need McDonald's. When the land provides, the corporate structures start to break down."

While Gyawali, who hails from Nepal, doesn't have that same ancestral drive to revitalize mesquite as a culinary ingredient, he does recognize its importance to the lifestyles and livelihoods of those who lived in Texas and the greater Southwest centuries ago. The Texas Mesquite Project is animated by a desire to re-establish the culinary use of mesquite because it's delicious, local, and has a rich cultural history. "I want to be the Johnny Appleseed of mesquite," he says.

With help from funds won via an Austin Food & Wine Alliance grant, Gyawali bought a hammermill, which he stores at the Barton Springs Mill headquarters and uses to grind the mesquite pods after they have been harvested, roasted, and dried.

> "Initially my idea was to make a flour available for retail sales, but there needs to be an educational component first. I realized that if I just made flour. no one was going to buy it or know Gyawali, you can about anything coffee, chocolate,

smoothies - and it will improve the flavor.

In order to put that claim to the test, I took home a tub of mesquite flour and whipped up a batch of chocolate chip cookies, replacing a third of the white flour with the mesquite flour. My 13-year-old son spooned up some of the dough and asked, "Did you add cinnamon to that?" A family friend described the flavor as "snickerdoodle-y." The cookies themselves, made with dark brown sugar, were decidedly nutty/

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malty, and the flavor of the mesquite worked very well with the caramelization of the brown sugar. The mesquite added a sweet depth and earthiness to the cookie that you wouldn't get from an ordinary Toll House recipe.

But it's true that without prior knowledge of how and within what context to use it, people aren't going to purchase a bag of mesquite flour and go to town with it in the kitchen. That's where Gyawali's canny partnerships with other local food purveyors who are among the food brands that have embraced the mission of the Texas Mesquite Project and have incorporated the ingredient into their goods come in. The Brewer's Table features mesquite baguette and butter on its menu; Cured in San Antonio makes a mesquite tres leches and a mesquite mole: Jester King released a Cerveza de Mezquite; SRSLY chocolate makes a mesquite "dirty white" chocolate; and Lick Honest Ice Creams added a honey-sweet mesquite cookie crumble ice cream to its summer menu. "People eat what they're offered. A lot of these brands are influencers in terms of how we eat," says Gyawali. What better entry point to a new and exotic foodstuff than via your favorite local brand?

Says Anthony Sobotik of Lick Honest Ice Creams, "Food, especially ice cream, serves as a nonintimidating vehicle to open a person's eyes to the history of what they're eating. In the case of the mesquite

That's sort of what happened to Owen Egerton this year during SXSW. Only it wasn't him, it was his second film as a writer/director, Blood Fest. And it wasn't simply on the wrong screen. It had been booked to play the Stateside (capacity 305), but demand was so high that, hours before its world premiere, South By management took the unprecedented step of moving it one door down into the 1,270 seat Paramount.

Four months later, and Egerton still seems a little dazed by the experience, like an impossible dream that started in 2001, when Richard Linklater screened Waking

Ever gone to the movies and found out *Life* in Austin's grandest theater. Back then, Egerton was in a band called the Ongoing Wow with poet and actor Speed Levitch. They'd been booked to play the afterparty, and so attended the screening. Egerton recalled, "There's a sequence where a character is sitting in the Paramount, watching a screen, as we're watching them in the Paramount, and I remember thinking, as I was seeing all these Austin creatives, that this is it. I didn't even have the words to say, I want to be doing this. I was just in awe."

Cut back to SXSW 2018, and there's writer/director Egerton, blinking at his unexpected upgrade. "I'd been having dinner," he said, "and I just wandered down to see Blood Fest on the marquee, and it blew my mind."

Part of the scale of the crowd was because Egerton is the latest addition to the ranks of Rooster Teeth, Austin's ever-expanding online entertainment empire, with its loyal international fan base. First they filled the Paramount in March; now they'll be cramming in again, for a special return screening in Austin's most prestigious theatre during the RTX Austin festival. Anyone that misses it then can hit one of the 600 screens nationwide showing it on Aug. 14 in a special simulcast, before it arrives on VOD and in regular theatres on Aug. 31.

For Egerton, a raucous packed house is the best home for a film like Blood Fest. After all, comedy and horror are a perfect fusion, because the best responses are involuntary. "Both are best experienced

with a crowd," he said. "I love sitting in a room, and people inadvertently announcing themselves with a scream, or a laugh." With some of his favorite comedy-gore movies as inspiration (Evil Dead 2, Dead Alive, Re-Animator, and, while it's never deliberately funny, "as everyone knows, I'm a little obsessed with Halloween 4"), he created a bloody romp about a one-night horror festival - like a gore-strewn Renaissance faire where the bloodshed starts to get a little too real. However, as they evade the mayhem, three horror nerds (The Legend of Korra's Seychelle Gabriel, Robbie Kay from Once Upon a Time, and Jacob Batalon, aka Peter Parker's best friend Ned from Spider-Man: Homecoming) find there's more at play than just the supernatural.

Owen Egerton is a creative polymath. As an original member of legendary movie spoofers Mr. Sinus Theater (and a repeat offender with its successor, Master Pancake) and Austin's go-to comedy emcee, he's been a regular on Austin stages for two decades. But he's also a novelist, from tart comedic romps like Everyone Says That at the End of the World to more serious literary fare like Hollow. By contrast, filmmaking seems like a late addition to his portfolio, but IMDb credits can be deceptive. His 2010 debut novel, The Book of Harold: The Illegitimate Son of God, was optioned by Warner Bros., and then he made his directorial debut Follow in 2015, before penning the script for 2017 supernatural horror The Axe Murders of Villisca. Beyond that, Egerton has been toiling away behind the scenes, often uncredited, at Fox, Warner Bros., and Disney studios.

That's the thing with Hollywood. It's a place where people go to be part of the process of making films, not to actually make films. "Los Angeles is so often caught up in development and delays," said Egerton, and sometimes the best way to make a film is to get away from that mentality. That explains Follow, a microbudget psychological drama that was less a two-hander than a solo performance ("the other hand was a corpse," said Egerton). But Blood Fest is a much bigger project, calling on Rooster Teeth's resources.

In hindsight, it's odd that it's taken so long for an Egerton/RT collaboration. "We were growing up in Austin at the same time," said Egerton. "I remember back during old Sinus shows at the old Alamo [Drafthouse] on Colorado, and they would do these specialty Red vs. Blue shows, and I would go, 'Who are these guys? What's going on?" Over the years, they crossed paths, "and I just thought they were doing the most creative stuff. They were bringing production to Austin, and they were constantly churning out wild and cool product."

But it was actually his Hollywood connections that led to Blood Fest. RT Head of Development Ryan Hall had read a couple of Egerton's scripts while he was still in L.A., and reached out to him, explaining that the studio was looking to expand into

both feature films and horror - what did he have that might work? "I had this idea, it was really just a page that I had worked up with my producer, Seth Caplan, of an Alamo-esque festival were everything goes incredibly real - or incredibly wrong.

He and Caplan originally pitched it as a TV show, but kept getting network feedback that it felt more like a feature. Then last year, he said, "Rooster Teeth went, why don't we just do that? Why don't we make it a film, and why don't we make it this summer? And we just went into action." By August, they were shooting in

a series of familiar Austinarea locations - Austin Studios, AFS Cinema, I Luv Video, and Sherwood Forest Faire - and seven months later, Blood Fest was packing out the Paramount.

Of course, having shifted from a TV show to a film, and from pitching to Hollywood to

an Austin production, Egerton kept thinking he'd have to trim the script. He credits RT CEO Matt Hullum with convincing him to put away the scissors. "I would go into meetings and go, 'I think we have to cut this. I don't see a way to do it,' and he'd go, 'Oh, but it's going to be so fun. It's going to look great in the trailer. Find a way."

Having the studio's in-house technical staff and performers to call on helped a lot, and Egerton worked closely in preproduction with stunt coordinator Jeff Schwan and visual effects house Hawgfly to design gags, stunts, and deaths. Even now, he's a little astonished by some of the sequences he kept, including a monsterstrewn truck ride to the center of Blood Fest: With a seemingly endless list of makeup, prosthetics, and stunts, on paper it would cost the whole budget, and take weeks, but Hullum's conviction that it

was too cool to cut won out. When it came to shooting, Egerton said, "We did all of it in one day.

In part, that's another return to that sensation he had back in 2001, watching people he knew onscreen and in the crowd for Waking Life. Blood Fest's production, he said, had "the vibe of what is Austin. People really excited about making something, and having a lot of fun making it, and aiming for something great." But this is not a purely homegrown film, with a cast that features Hollywood names like Zachary Levi (soon to star in comic adaptation

Shazam!) and veteran character actor Tate Donovan - the only person Egerton ever considered for the part of Dr. Conway, the puritanical talkshow opponent of horror culture. "There's a reason we have seen him in so many different films and shows," said Egerton of the versatile performer. "We


started talking about his character, and Republicans, and people who are so vocally against something that they become the thing they are fighting, and he said that this would be a blast."

That may be what binds this to Egerton's more highbrow literary work - that the bloodshed and decapitations are balanced by broader questions of censorship and reactionary politics. "In the film," he said, "we have zombies, we have vampires, we have demonic nuns, but the most scarv figure of all is a white man with a gun and a sense of privilege."



A Father in Name Alone

Brutally accurate portrait of mental and physical abuse in *Custody*

Spousal and parental abuse is not just physical; it's the psychological strain that's just as galling and damaging. Yet, as portrayed in writer/director Xavier Legrand's assured and measured first feature Custody, one is often a prelude or companion to the other. The opening sequence is pure he said, she said in a French family court hearing, as a judge takes evidence from both sides in what is clearly an unpleasant divorce proceeding. Antoine Besson (tough guy Ménochet, best known to American audiences for Inglourious Basterds) looks outgunned, the only man in the room, and shot down every time he opens his mouth by the lawyer for his soon-to-be-ex-wife Miriam (Drucker). He cuts a semi-sympathetic figure, and the judge rules that he should have parental access to his son Julien (Gioria) - their elder daughter Joséphine (Auneveux) being ruled mature enough to decide whether she wants contact or not. In a blunt foreshadowing of what is to come, she doesn't.

From the evidence presented – especially a written statement from Julien that sounds like Miriam coached him - this seems like a reasonable judgment. But Legrand's script quickly reveals that Antoine is just using Julien to keep a fingerhold in Miriam's life. He's a manipulator, but not a cunning evil genius, à la Patrick Bergin in Sleeping With the Enemy. He's just intimidating, with a knack for cruelty toward those weaker than him.

Building on his 2014 Oscarnominated short "Just Before Losing Everything," Legrand delicately pieces together a portrait of a family fractured beyond repair, and it's Ménochet's nuanced depiction of Antoine - a short-fuse thug, a terrible son, and a worse father and

husband - that gives Custody its crystal clarity. His performance is a case study of the difference between empathy and sympathy: We understand Antoine as more than a cartoon bully, but that doesn't make him any more likable. His control and abuse of Julien as a

proxy for Miriam is emotionally accurate, a disturbing depiction of casual family brutality.

Legrand concentrates on the growing dysfunction between father and son, meaning that both Miriam and especially Joséphine

> sink a little into the background. However, he balances that lopsided character development with a slow ratcheting of the tension, as Antoine's actions become more overtly danger-

ous. Yet Legrand avoids all thriller tropes, instead combining the visual assurance of contemporary French cinema with a grounded kitchen-sink drama sensibility, evocative of Ken Loach at his most incisive. He even weaves in some stylized set-pieces. including a lengthy and impeccably structured sequence at Joséphine's

18th birthday party. A peerless fusing of dumbshow performance and background sound editing, there's a rising panic that allows the final, violent closing act to seem shockingly organic.

the Supreme Court handed down the Citizens United decision in 2010 (which ruled that political spending is a form of free speech protected under the First Amendment and that corporations and unions are permitted to spend unlimited amounts of money to support candidates, provided the funds are technically independent of the campaigns themselves), the subject of campaign finance law has never been more inflammatory and urgent.

"Campaign finance is like the gateway issue to every other issue that you might care about - whether it be education or tax reform or foreign policy," says Ann M. Ravel, the former chairwoman of the Federal Election Commission and one of this film's more inspiring and succinct speakers. Ravel is indicative of some of the federal policy wonks and organizations dedicated to overthrowing the Citizens United decision. Yet director Kimberly Reed makes a shrewd choice to center her film in the state of Montana. Although the state's sparse population would make it seem like an unlikely testing ground for campaign-finance reform, there are fascinating historical reasons to examine the fight there. In 1912, Montana passed the Corrupt Practices Act, which prohibited the so-called Copper Kings and other corporate powerhouses and mining barons from buying state legislators as they had done previously in the 1894 state elections. With the Corrupt Practices Act already on the state's books, Montana was in a unique position to challenge the imposition of the new contrary federal guidelines wrought by the Citizens United decision.

Dark Money opens with accounts from several Montana candidates who were targeted by dark-money interests. For example: Campaign advertising flooded voters' mailboxes with cards blasting a sensationalistic reference to John Wayne Gacy, "the Killer Clown," pedophile rapist, and murderer, and how the candidate in question, John Ward, "believes that monsters like this deserve to live." A group with the innocuous name of Mothers Against Child Predators was listed as the sender of the flyers: However, the group was merely a front for a deep-pocketed

Even though this documentary is pitched as a "political thriller," there's an inherent challenge in shaping the topic of campaign finance law into exciting film subject matter. And while Dark Money largely succeeds in this mission, uneven storytelling sometimes deflects the film's impact. Nevertheless, since

super PAC that didn't have to identify itself, thanks to Citizens United. Many Montana candidates and examples of the attacks on them are pursued in the film, which soon brings in a new character, John Adams, an investigative reporter for the Great Falls Tribune. Later, Adams' saga threatens to become the dominant thread in Dark Money when his newspaper shuts down its capitol bureau in Helena, Mont., and Adams takes to the road and a new online news enterprise: The Montana Free Press. Adams and representatives from groups like Followthemoney. org manage to track down some of the ultimate donors to the super PACS, such as American Tradition Partnership and the Koch Brothers' Americans for Prosperity.

The film's basic problem is that it jumps around too much, with an array of speakers from Montana to Washington, D.C. to California. The interviewees can become a blur of characters, while well-known beneficiaries of Citizens United, such as the Koch Brothers, are hardly mentioned. As well, the movie follows a chronological storyline rather than thematic, which makes the narrative's constant jumps necessary. Still, Reed (The Death and Life of Marsha P. Johnson and Prodigal Sons) and her team have boiled down their presentation to a manageable 99 minutes that's fascinating, absorbing, and mind-altering. In these particular times that test our American democratic values on so many different fronts, the subject of who's funding our political causes and candidates is a matter that needs to be at the top of our priority list. After all, as Ann Ravel also points out, our current time places us now "in the proving ground of the American experiment."

DEATH OF A NATION

So, what is America? Land of the free, home of the brave, to be sure, but that just seems like outdated jingoism these days. Whatever beliefs you think to be true on either side of the fence (and there is a fence, if not a big looming wall), freedom, bravery, and the truth appear to currently be in short supply. Dinesh D'Souza's new doc attempts to paint the Democratic Party as racists and fascists, and aligning all manner of horrible people (mainly Adolf Hitler, but hey, let's throw in Josef Mengele for good measure) to the left. And make no mistake, this is filmmaking as polemic, and much in the same way as Michael Moore's (much better) films

have a particular agenda to puzzle out various ways in which our country has failed us, this traffics in the same vein.

This latest salvo from D'Souza (you may or may not have the fond remembrances of 2016: Obama's America, or the sequel, lazily named Hillary's America) posits a thesis statement that compares Republican president Abraham Lincoln with our current commander in chief, Donald Trump. That thesis often gets bogged down in the many other points and pathways that D'Souza embarks on.

Opening with Trump's presidential victory in 2016, the film has the requisite footage of slack-jawed liberals and incredulous news analysts coming to grips with the new world order. As to Trump's more than checkered past, all that's said is that they knew they weren't electing a choirboy. But the demonization of the antifa movement, equating it to Mussolini's Blackshirts, is just an easy out, as footage of bandanna-clad miscreants breaking storefront windows and destroying property is depicted with a pearl-clutching voiceover. But then (thankfully) the narrative turns to a more cohesive argument, but one that proposes an iteration of American leftist ideology that D'Souza traces to a letter that Hitler wrote to American progressives in the late Thirties. "You see!" he cobbles his thoughts, and the world turns around to face a rather silly and frankly dangerous view of how we live our lives in the 21st century. Cue D'Souza strolling around historic sites, with fashionable scarves and a look of perpetual questioning, as if he hasn't already run the numbers and figured out the score. Look. this is a film that either speaks to you or not; it is not something that is going to sway you by telling heart-wrenching stories of Sophie Scholl or "seeing the other side," by interviewing Richard Spencer, an interview that goes nowhere, that reveals D'Souza for what he is, someone who anticipates the answer as he asks the question. Great stuff if you're drinking the Kool-Aid, but to a sane person, it seems like a fantasy.

GENERATION WEALTH D: Lauren Greenfield; narrated by Lauren Greenfield. (R, 106 min.)

It's not entirely clear what "generation" is the guilty one being examined in filmmaker Lauren Greenfield's third full-length documentary, but it's safe to say that we are now several decades into the decline of Western civilization (that Creem critic was right, you guys). I suppose you could say that Generation Wealth is a sort of "spiritual sequel" to Greenfield's previous feature, The Queen of Versailles. And if you scratched your head at the end of that film, as I did, and thought, "What was the point of all that?" I think you might find some answers with this project. I say project because the film is a culmination of Greenfield's work over the last 25 years, linking themes found in her photography and films: She explores glitz & glamour but also probes the unsavory depths of their true cost – nowhere more apparent than in her gripping yet almost unbearable depiction of anorexia. Thin.

Generation Wealth is as much a personal journey as anything - throughout the film Greenfield is shown sifting through half a million photographs for publication in a book, and she revisits some of her earliest subjects, overprivileged kids from her old high school in L.A., and she interviews her own parents. There's also an exiled former hedge fund manager; a single mother who goes to Brazil for plastic surgery; a porn star who was briefly famous for being mixed up with




Charlie Sheen; novelist Bret Easton Ellis; and journalist Chris Hedges, whose doomsday rhetoric reads like Chicken Little telling us the sky is falling. At one point her dad says, "You're all over the place," and that pretty much sums it up.

Without much of a focus or any type of overarching narrative, the film is an indictment of capitalism (yusss) and all of us (okay?) for creating a world in which 14 seasons of Keeping Up With the Kardashians is allowed to exist. Everything is terrible. but we knew that already. The closest thing to redemption is the hedge fund manager's Jacob Marley-esque lament: Damn these chains I forged in life (this is the same guy who says, "I loooooove money" in the first scene). That dude is given way too much airtime, and Greenfield inserts herself and her own narrative (a frenzied search for an answer to "Am La workaholic?!") into the movie more than is wise. The moral lesson of "spend more time with loved ones" is pretty weak sauce if I'm being honest: It's nothing more than an unheeded warning sign on the edge of the diamond-encrusted road straight to ruin.

THE SPY WHO DUMPED ME

Well into a summer blockbuster season that starts now in, oh, roughly late March, by August we've all recalibrated our expectations, come to some peace with substandard offerings. Just as a hot dog dropped in dirt at a backyard barbecue is blithely dusted off and inhaled in three bites - it's still a hot dog, and besides, you're drunk - the flimsiest of film entertainments is met with the same shrug. The seats are cushy, the airconditioning cold, MoviePass has lived to see another day (wait, lemme check my phone), and "big dumb fun" is now and forever the song of summer.

So when I say the instantly forgettable action-comedy The Spy Who Dumped Me is fine, I guess what I mean is: It's fine. It's not a debacle. It'll do? There are infinitely better movies out there in the world, and also in the smaller circumference of Austin theatres right now, and I encourage you to scan our film reviews to find them.

But you want to know about this movie? Sure. Fine.

This movie opens with Scorpions' "Wind of Change," that heartfelt but cringey 1990 power ballad about the winding down of the Cold War. Its reason for being in this movie blew past me (it's used to much better effect in Alex Holdridge's In Search of a Midnight Kiss; incidentally, also a better movie). I guess maybe the song is playing on the sad jukebox where the sad Audrey (Kunis) is celebrating her sad birthday? Already driftless. Audrey is now depressed, too, ever since her live-in boyfriend Drew (Theroux) ended things via text. Said dumper - the title's spy - we meet in the middle of a Lithuanian shootout that establishes early the film's hard-R, uncartoonish, and surprisingly egalitarian philosophy of violence. (Lots of people get shot in the head here, and they're not all bad guys!) Audrey doesn't know about Drew's day job as a CIA agent until the bullet spray relocates to her L.A. apartment, and from there

she's off to the races, on the run in Europe with her best friend Morgan (McKinnon, extending her patent on kooky), in possession of a highly coveted MacGuffin and unsure who to trust amidst an international array of spies, assassins, and Uber drivers.

Director Susanna Fogel put a lens on female friendship in her first feature, the 2014 indie Life Partners, and that is also The Spy Who Dumped Me's primary interest. Kunis and McKinnon don't exactly set the screen on fire with their chemistry, and there are only the most perfunctory shadings to their characters. Still, as the film hopscotches between foreign capitals, the action growing ever more ludicrous with each passport stamp, their friendship becomes the truest, weightiest thing about the film, especially when their level of intimacy is tested in a torture scene that turns out to be the film's funniest setpiece. Fogel and co-writer David Iserson also effectively mine lady-centric micro-jokes from Morgan's conscious feminism and scene stealer Lolly Adefope as a textbook frenemy.

The other swings for comedy punch, or poke, along the spectrum, including the lowhanging fruit of a swinging nutsack sight gag and a death match played out before an unwitting audience in formal wear who confuse the fisticuffs with performance art. Their clueless applause reminded me of 1978's Chevy Chase-Goldie Hawn accidentally-stepped-intocriminal-intrigue comedy Foul Play, while a tease of Henry Mancini's "The Pink Panther Theme" score calls back to an even earlier era of capering comedy. But the movie this movie most recalls is Spy, Paul Feig's 2015 comedy starring Melissa McCarthy, which betters The Spy Who Dumped Me not just in brevity of title but in execution. The bones are the same: Both films span action and comedy, spy parody and sincere female empowerment hoorahs, bonds of friendship tested and surprising inner resources tapped when staring peril in the face. But only one film boasts nuance, cleverness, a hero worth rooting for, memorable secondary characters, and a light touch with broad humor. The other film has a nutsack sight gag it deems so irresistibly funny it replays it in the closing credits. Fine, I give up.

ANT-MAN AND THE WASP

Post-Captain America: Civil War, inadvertent hero Ant-Man aka Scott Lang (Rudd) just wants to get through his parole, but trouble comes knocking, direct from the Quantum Realm. Hank Pym (Douglas) and Hope (Lilly) want what's in his head - the whereahouts of lanet van Dyne (Pfeiffer), missing in the space between atoms for 30 years. But they're not the only people with agendas: High-level fence Sonny Burch (Goggins) wants all that delicious tech, and the mysterious Ghost (John-Kamen) is after van Dyne for her own nefarious reasons. BLINDSPOTTING

Police violence, racial identity, cultural appropriation, hipsters, NIMBYists, personal responsibility, gentrification - Blindspotting works because it doesn't try to separate these multifaceted questions. Instead, in a winding, episodic narrative that is still crystal elegant, it binds them together, demanding that we look at them all as a whole. Funny, vibrant, insightful, tragic, achingly timely, and yet with an underlying message about empathy that is timeless, Blindspotting may be the summer's most essential movie. (07/27/2018)

O DON'T WORRY. HE WON'T **GET FAR ON FOOT**

In the era of American cartoonists like Gary Larson and Bill Patterson as unlikely megastars, John Callahan was the taboo-busting success story throwing stones on their parade. Yet Gus Van Sant's long-gestating biopic of the paralyzed artist doesn't portray him as damaged but noble provocateur. In his second award-worthy performance of the year, Phoenix plays Callahan as a success story in spite of himself, literally the guy who speeds through traffic in a wheelchair. There's an undeniable episodic feel, with scenes sometimes built to highlight a particular trait or character beat for Callahan, and the supporting cast is often underserved - except for Hill in a stellar performance as as Donnie, John's sponsor and often the only person who accepts and demolishes his bullshit. Yet it's really Phoenix that binds the whole piece together, capturing a life as a process, and a man of many aspects. (07/20/2018)

But those videos deceptively project an image of an emotionally assured teenager that's in heartbreaking contrast to the anguished Kayla IRL, who struggles each day to emerge from her miserable cocoon to become someone (anyone!) other than the unexceptional person she sees every morning in a bathroom mirror. First-time feature filmmaker Burnham does a remarkable job of chronicling the rare highs and frequent lows of Kayla's last week in middle school, but this is Fisher's film. There are set-pieces in this film, especially the last 30 minutes, that set the bar for bigbudget, rich-people-entertaining-you-with-their-own-stunts spectacle. Surprisingly, what lets Skyscraper down is its lack of scale. Its outlandish premise deserves the kind of eye-popping action sequences normally reserved for a Fast and the Furious sequel. but the film instead settles for a heavy dose of digital effects. 

SORRY TO BOTHER YOU

In an alternative Oakland, Cassius Green (Stanfield) is unemployed and living in his uncle's garage with his subversive artist girlfriend Detroit (Thompson). When his friend hips him to a telemarketing gig, his calls to annoyed recipients are depicted as he literally drops into their home. It is merely the first of a phantasmagorical array of inventiveness and cinematic shenanigans that hip-hop artist-turned-filmmaker Boots Riley concocts. His film is a welcome hand grenade of subversive power reminiscent of Terry Gilliam's classic Brazil: Much like that 1985 gem, Sorry to Bother You's cup spilleth over with so much content at any given time that it takes on a bit more than it can chew, but its humor, its commentary, its continuous and relentless spiral into madness is grounded

Struggling to Get by in Rome

THE PURE PERFECTION AND MODERN RESONANCE OF BICYCLE THIEVES LIVES ON by Josh Kupecki

There's a scene in The Player. Robert Altman's brilliant evisceration of Hollywood, where soulless studio exec Griffin Mill (slimily embodied by Tim Robbins) hits up a screening of **Vittorio de Sica**'s Bicycle Thieves in order to suss out a potential stalker (babyfaced Vincent D'Onofrio). The two chat awk-

wardly in the lobby, with Mill asking the young writer if he'd like to write the remake. "You'd probably give it a happy ending," D'Onofrio's character replies. "No, we'd keep it pure," Mill lies.

It's one of endless barbs thrown at the studio system in that wonderfully acerbic film, but the key word here is pure. As far as the history of cinema goes, there are few films as pure as Bicycle Thieves (né The Bicycle Thief, long story). A masterpiece of the Italian neorealist movement, this film tells a simple and heartbreaking story of an unemployed man. Antonio, (Lamberto Maggiorani) who gets a

job gluing up posters in post-World War II Rome. The only problem is that the gig requires a bicycle, a bicycle that he has already pawned to feed his wife Maria (Lianella Carell) and sons. Selling their bedsheets to get it back, the fates seem to be in his favor. But on his first day on the job, the

titular criminals abscond with his bike and he spends the rest of the film hopelessly searching the piazzas and markets, his desperation palpable. When it becomes all too clear that he will never retrieve his bike, he is

reduced to stealing a bike himself, and is immediately caught. The narrative may be sparse, but Bicvcle Thieves is one of the most vibrant and alive films committed to celluloid.

That is in no small part due to the nonactors filling the frame. Neither Maggiorani (a factory worker by trade) nor Carell (a journalist) had ever been in front of the camera. As to the indelible performance from the son



Bruno (Enzo Staiola), well, de Sica found him just loitering on a street corner and cast him on the spot. It is one of those films that was made from a convergence of kismet or fate: de Sica's obsession with neorealist storytelling, Luigi Bartolini's original novel Ladri di Biciclette, and the vibrancy of 1948 Rome in all its splendor, but much more telling, all of its poverty. The vertigo-inducing shelves of linens on which the family's sheets are stored become just one more addition. The mobs of workers are trying to feed their families, but

jobs are scarce. There is a scene in a restaurant where Antonio takes Bruno for lunch. defeated by the search for his missing bike. While Antonio gets drunk, Bruno becomes preoccupied by the table of a rich family, and he begins mimicking the well-to-do boy's eating habits. A small scene, but one that speaks volumes on the gulf of the haves and the have-nots. But de Sica lavs no judgment. In fact, to say that Bicycle Thieves is one of the greatest humanist films is an understatement. This is a film that lights the soul.



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Eviction Notice

Austin's dance music community has taken a hit. Two venues responsible for many high-profile electronic acts coming through town abruptly shuttered in July. Owners of each business, **Kingdom** and **Ethics Music Lounge**, found themselves locked out by their new landlord – the same one who just purchased **Empire Control Room**.

The buildings of the two dance clubs were recently acquired by **World Class Capital Group**, an investment firm whose owner, 31-year-old homegrown real estate tycoon **Nate Paul**, makes headlines for major property deals and as the subject of million-dollar lawsuits. Last year, **Forbes** pegged Paul's assets at \$1.2 billion, a significant portion being prime commercial space in Austin.

Ethics and Kingdom

Ethics Music Lounge, a rooftop venue at 422 Congress that opened in 2013, specialized in house music and hosted ticketed shows with internationally touring DJs like **Black Coffee** and **Damian Lazarus** in addition to local residencies. Owner **Vincent Salvaggio** claims he dropped off a rent check in July at the office of his previous landlord, **Alex Bahrami**, not knowing the building had been sold. World Class Capital then locked his doors for delinquent payment.

"They had me locked out before I even got the legal paperwork that they owned it and they haven't let me back in to get my shit – not my sound system, not even my checkbook," says Salvaggio. "They're trying to raise the rent on everything, so it's good for [them] to get people out who are playing lower rent."

Insisting this isn't the end of Ethics, Salvaggio says he's already secured a "temporary home" for the club on Sixth Street, which he plans to have open by mid-September.

Since establishing in 2011, the 300-capacity Kingdom built a legit reputation for booking acclaimed DJs in the EDM, house, and techno fields for improbable underplays. Owner **Garrett Boyd**, reached on Monday, declined to comment, but sources with knowledge of the situation say the club's operators may not have been made aware of the building's sale prior to rent being due to World Class Capital, which had also purchased that property – 103 E. Fifth – from Bahrami. Similarly, they found their locks changed.

Burgener believes Kingdom and Ethics helped put Austin on the map internationally with DJs and booking agents.

"The biggest names in the game knew those clubs and wanted to play there, even if they had to take a pay cut because they were small," he says. "Seeing **John Digweed** play to 300 people is unheard of and he did that at Kingdom."

Capital Gains

Since Nate Paul's founding in 2007, World Class Capital has made a lot of deals. Music venues haven't always fared well in them.

WCCG evicted **Metal and Lace**, formerly **Headhunters**, in 2014. Since then, the two-building lot has remained empty – the only unoccupied shell other than the old **Emo's** in

Karma Lounge, a nightclub employed annually by the South by Southwest Music Conference, shared a wall with Kingdom. It too shuttered last month. A World Class Capital vinyl banner appeared on the building: "Moving from California? What took you so long?"

"It's sad for the dance music community," says **Todd Burgener**, who's spun house music in Austin for 20 years as **Toddy B**. "In this little city, we only have a couple real dance venues and those were the main ones. Not having them is detrimental to the scene, both for the fans and the DJs, who now have fewer places to play."

the **Red River Cultural District**. Two years earlier, historic venue **La Zona Rosa** went dark under WCCG ownership. Thereafter, the building was repurposed for offices and an event space.

Beloved **Momo's** might still be open today if WCCG hadn't allegedly forced its closure. A source with direct knowledge of events tells "Playback" that in late 2011, shortly after WCCG purchased the West Sixth property, a construction crew cut a support beam while renovating the former **Katz Deli** space below it, causing Momo's floor to buckle. The venue, which still had a decade worth of options on its lease, ceased operation after

WCCG made it clear they didn't want a music club as a tenant. Operators took a settlement and vacated.

Venues, which notoriously eke by on small profit margins and exist in cheap rent zones, aren't ideal tenants for property investors looking to redevelop, sell, or rent at higher rates. On the other hand, they're crucial in creating the cultural value Austin's enjoyed for the better part of three decades.

Not all real estate speculation is adversarial to live music. **Gary Keller**, billionaire co-founder of **Keller Williams Realty**, is investing heavily in Austin music preservation via his **All ATX** nonprofit. When Keller buys your property, as he did with the **Saxon Pub** in 2016, venue owners breathe a huge sigh of relief.

World Class Capital did not respond to an interview request for this story.

Building Empires

"This is where local acts cut their teeth," says **Stephen Sternschein** of **Control Room**, the 5,000-square-foot interior space of his live music complex on Seventh near Red River.

Empire Control Room & Garage is actually two properties. The larger Garage parcel, typically used for touring acts, is owned by one of Sternschein's business partners, **Trey Spaw**. The Control Room, at 606 E. Seventh, is rented.

Sternschein had been paying monthly on it for some time, unable to secure a favorable lease with his landlord. Aware that the property owners were eager to sell, Sternschein tried to raise capital to buy it, knowing that if he secured the lofty \$2 million-plus sale price, he would have to essentially double his own rent. He ran out of time. His landlord recently informed him that a sale to WCCG was imminent.

As of last Thursday, Sternschein felt his days were numbered at 606 E. Seventh, but after finally meeting with Paul on Tuesday, he says he's "cautiously optimistic" a deal can be worked out in which Empire keeps the Control Room. Financial specifics of a lease had yet to be negotiated.

If the two parties cannot come to terms, it will mean one less quality stage for Austin. In that event, Sternschein will consider rehoming shows at the **Parish**, which his company, **Heard Presents**, co-owns. He's also exploring the idea of putting a garage door on the Garage to make it scalable for smaller concerts. Meanwhile, he's also still working on securing a lease, alongside **Elysium** owner **John Wickham**, on the former **Sidewinder** building around the corner. Still, he knows venue/developer incompatibility will remain an issue in Austin.

"It's a problem for our scene and we've known about it for years," says Sternschein. "We've asked the city to do something, we put together focus groups, and you know what's come out it? Nothing. Checkbooks talk and these guys are writing big checks. I'll give them the benefit of the doubt. I don't think their goal is to shut down music, but we haven't made any meaningful changes to our code to protect venues from getting pushed out."

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San Marcos Tonight

Something's brewing between ATX and STX

On a March evening in 2016, inside the Dahlia Woods Art Gallery in San Marcos, a mixtape release party transpired unassumingly. Hosting such events regularly, the community exhibition center acts as a headquarters for local artists of the small college town. Bumping through the speakers was All-American Trash, debut release from local rap group Brockhampton.

Kevin Abstract, the song cycle's chief creative, stood at the center of the room wearing his signature motorcycle helmet. The rest of the project's producers, from UT student Merlyn Wood to Texas State music major Russell Boring, aka Joba, scattered themselves around the lightly attended event.

Attendees scrolled through their phones, others sold merch, while the rest listened, sang, and danced.

By summer, the group had relocated to Los Angeles, landed a TV show on Viceland, and proceeded to drop three smash-hit albums within the span of six months.

In the process, Brockhampton redefined the mainstream's definition of a boy band. By trading bland

pop for righteous rhymes intertwined with catchy choruses and cosmopolitan production, the crew brought the novelty genre under the umbrella of modern music's preeminent sound. And yet, on that night more than two years ago, few could have expected that the biggest hip-hop act at ACL Fest this October - likely the most anticipated rap crew to hit a Zilker Park stage since Outkast in 2014 - would have emerged from San Marcos.

Thirty minutes down I-35, the Texas State University hub sits in the shadow of Austin. Nevertheless, its fertile music scene is thriving in its own right. Only 30 square miles and numbering some 60,000 inhabitants, the town where Stevie Ray Vaughan once sequestered himself to record has begun defying narrow city limits with raw talent and homemade support even as Austin and San Antonio inch toward becoming one metropolitan area.

TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY

Witness a man with no shoes jump onto the back of a moving, rainbow-painted school bus and it's easy to feel like you've receded

several decades in San Marcos. Fortunately, over the last several years, that retro quirk has begun to fade. Between 2013 and 2015, San Marcos notched the fastest-growing city in America, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Texas State sparks much of the surge. Servicing 38,000 students, it became a research institution in 2016 after 19 straight years of enroll-

ment growth. The school characterizes its hometown much like Denton is defined by the University of North Texas, the first institution in the country to offer a jazz degree. UNT remains the top choice for young musicians in the state.

Credit, in part, Thomas Clark. Before becoming the director of Texas State's School of Music, Clark held down a faculty spot at UNT.





"I had an impression all those years when I was living in Denton about San Marcos being a sleepy little college town," says Clark.

Things started to change in 2008 with Clark's arrival. At the time, Taylor Wilkins, frontman of Austin metal act Otis the Destroyer, put together his first band, the Couch, while in his second year at Texas State.

"There weren't many people in bands that were in the Texas State music school," says Wilkins. "Denton had that, the combination of incredible jazz musicians and bands, but it was more punk rock in San Marcos – not as many musicians focused on the music."

Lack of venues to play proved one major obstacle. Case in point: After hosting 6,887 straight nights of live music, the Triple Crown closed in December 2015.

"That scattered the scene," says Steve Jones, a radio personality at Texas State radio frequency KTSW and publisher of the city's concert listing website SanMarcos Tonight.com. "People at small venues picked up the slack."

Valentino's Pizza, Kiva Lounge (now named the Morgue), and Tantra Coffeehouse led the charge of local businesses adding stages to their footprint. However makeshift, this abundance lent musicians lowpressure environments to learn their practice. Accessibility thus invigorated San Marcos' live music scene.

"Austin is the live music capital of the world, but San Marcos is starting to be its younger cousin," says Clark, adding that Texas State's population now exceeds that of UNT. "A lot of that is coming from our program."

Groups such as the neo-soul quartet Blumoon and indie rockers Lantic are coming together in Texas State music classes.

"There's been a recent increase in talent in this new crop of young bands," says Troy Vita, producer of KTSW's Studio C series, which features live performances from local bands. "We have a really good crop of student bands right now."

SARAH STREET

San Marcos' proximity to Austin is beginning to attract musicians the way the state capital has over the past quarter-century.

"It's between ATX and STX to where we can get gigs in both places," offers Andrew Harkey of Blumoon. "That's a pulling factor for a lot of musicians coming here. Also, it's not Austin. Austin is very popular, musicians on every corner, but it's saturated."

Much of the scene's vibrancy occurs outside of the downtown square. From Rock Bottom's bluegrass fusion to Attic Ted's freak psych, many of San Marcos' defining acts make a name for themselves through DIY shows.

"The music scene thrives because people bust ass to put on their own shows," affirms Mackenzie Dart of Rock Bottom String Band.

While performance spaces continue multiplying, many reside in restaurants and coffee shops where families go for meals and live music stays in the background. Homemade shows remain the workaround.

"Valentino's would try to have rap shows, but it's a family pizza shop, so rappers can't be going in there flipping tables," acknowledges Kenny Casanova, rapper in the city's fast-rising rap group Pnthn. "We really had to create our own venues."

Spaces range from basements and yoga studios to bamboo forests. Anywhere that's big enough to mosh can be a venue.

"The most successful shows around town are house parties because most people are underage or they just don't wanna go to bars," says Blumoon singer Kendra Sells.

Until just recently, Sarah Street constituted the epicenter of the DIY scene. A few blocks from campus, its house parties jolted the surrounding neighborhood into the wee hours. One conductor of that energy was student-led collective Chapter 12 Records. Founded as a record label for Texas State musicians, the venture caught momentum when co-founder Michael Howard stumbled upon a string band house party show in 2014 and subsequently threw his own musical bacchanal.

"I had never seen bluegrass, never seen people doing percussion with strings and a washboard," reminisces Howard. "I thought, 'I want to showcase this as much as possible."

Howard and a couple of buddies moved into a house on Sarah Street and started organizing afternoon jams and evening gigs. Business bustled. The party soon sprawled out onto the block, with Chapter 12 organizing themed parties for Halloween. MLK Day, and Christmas.

As with most house parties, police soon killed the buzz. "Cops started coming around 10pm and swiftly shut down house shows," laments Casanova.

In 2017, Chapter 12 launched the Martian Although still a small Arts Festival, a two-day camping experience at High Road Rocky Ranch, which sits about 20 minutes outside of downtown San Marcos. A stacked bill of local musicians and artists culminated in 500 attendees its first year and close to 900 people

marked the second annual event in April. Its success prompted Chapter 12 to rebrand as Apogee Presents, a promotions company they hope becomes "the Margin Walker of San Marcos."

STILL SAN MARCOS, NOT AUSTIN

San Marcos is the 59th largest city in Texas. The music scene is young and promising, but financing careers it isn't.

"There is essentially no way to sustain a music career there," says Wilkins.

Spaces such as the Morgue and Tantra aren't Hotel Vegas or Swan Dive. They're not going to spend much on music because it isn't the lifeblood of their business. People are going to have a slice of pizza or a beer regardless of if there's a band playing.

"It's really hard in San Marcos, because no one wants to pay," grouses Cold Tony's frontman Michael Martinez.

The Tony's are among a crop of San Marcos bands that boast an established following through ample local gigging, but in a college town, most won't progress beyond that. Patrons are on student budgets, so few shell out more than a couple of dollars for a meal, let alone a cover charge.

"There's this weird gap where bars can't book bands because no one will pay a cover charge and then established bands don't want to play because they don't get compensated," reveals Eli Zablosky, head of marketing and promotion for Chapter 12/Apogee Presents.

> Musicians hope a dedicated venue will bridge the gap.

> "We're hurting for a good, small, indoor says Alex venue," Schultz of Rock Bottom String Band. "Young bands need a place that books shows on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday to work out their live performance on an actu-

al sound system and an actual stage."

Before that happens, business owners need proof young San Martians have room for live music in their time and budget. The city has no dedicated music store, and the only record shop in town, Superfly's Lone Star Music Emporium, closed last year.

"You gotta think about the rest of the students that don't dress like us and don't think like us," says Harkey. "The EDM culture is more widespread than the live music scene."

Not seeing cash from live gigs is a reality for most musicians in 2018. Expecting San Marcos to become a performance powerhouse that funds lives might be asking the scene to grow in ways those within it are wary. Much of San Marcos' ethos is shaped by its defiance against becoming Austin.

"San Marcos does not want to be Austin," savs Rock Bottom String Band vocalist Tara Miller. "I've lived close enough to Austin to see how money has destroyed what people fell in love with Austin [for] in the first place."

"We have something really authentic coming from a bunch of kids playing their hearts out simply for the love of it," adds Dart. "Just because we don't get a bunch of 'big' bands coming through I feel like many folks tend to discount us right off the bat."

INSIDE THE BUBBLE

No stretch to predict another hip-hop endeavor from San Marcos hitting ACL Fest stages soon. Pnthn, a forceful 10-man rap group, have burst onto the national radar from the same small college scene Brockhampton emerged out of just two years ago.

Where the latter coddles singable melodies, Pnthn goes for the throat with a constant stream of sharp flows over bobbing and weaving, Southern-fried production. Formed only last year, the crew's string of successful DIY shows in San Marcos has hoisted them upon a wave of momentum yet to crash. Prominent publications including Pitchfork and Lyrical Lemonade have caught on, and this weekend the MC syndicate opens for cult rap hero Lil B at Mohawk.

Although still a small scene largely built in homes, pizza shops, and espresso bars, San Marcos stakes a larger claim in trending acts Pnthn and Brockhampton, who reflect what makes the music scene exciting right now. Like a farm system in baseball, the city remains intimate enough for any local act to captivate fans and close enough to urban action for raw talents to become stars.

"San Marcos is a bubble, but any act can burst through with the support of the city," says producer Por Vida. "The people will support great music acts because they know they deserve more than to be playing in the same college town."





Ben Danaher left Austin for Nashville in 2011 with tragedy licking at his heels. His brother Kelly had been murdered a year earlier in their hometown of Huffman in a controversial, high-profile stand-your-ground case. He then lost his father to cancer.

"There was a period of time that was just a dumpster fire, where it was almost impossible to even function in any part of my life," admits the 34-year-old songwriter on trying to pick up the pieces in Tennessee. "It's hard to walk into a writers' room in Nashville and be like, 'I've got an idea for a song. It's about my brother dying.' You just end up making things awkward."

A summer living with his grandmother in Vermont helped provide perspective, and Danaher returned to Nashville with a more sober sense of purpose. The result is next month's debut LP Still Feel Lucky, which burns with a hard-learned insight of life and loss atop his graveled vocals. "My Father's Blood," "Time Never Moves Slower," and the title track reach beyond grief to find solace and hope.

"I feel like I have a voice now," Danaher says. "When I was living in Texas, I was hoping to just get lucky with some kind of break or even just find something to say. But with everything that happened with my brother and my dad, as gruesome as it was, getting out on the other side of that, there's an undeniable message now.

"Songs will dictate where they want to go most of the time, and I think that's part of the therapy in songwriting: You don't know where it's going to take you." - Doug Freeman

The Do's and Don'ts of Lady Bird Lake

I traveled on vacation and jumped off a bridge into a river. It was cool. I told my friends and now we want to jump off one of the bridges into Lady Bird Lake. Is that legal? - Ethan Toney

No. While the Texas Water Safety Act provides general water laws across the state, the city of Austin created a few more specific rules for bodies of water in Austin. According to ordinance §8-5-44(A) it is unlawful for any person to dive or jump from any bridge which crosses the Colorado River within city limits, which includes Lady Bird Lake (aka Town Lake for longtime Austinites).

This ordinance was put into place for good reason, since anyone who has been to Lady Bird Lake knows that you can only see about a foot in front of you in the water. While the lake may look inviting on a hot summer day, concrete and rebar from old bridges and dams lurk beneath the surface. In 2012, a man impaled his leg on some rebar, and just a few weeks ago a teen hit his head after diving in. Bridge jumping is also dangerous because of things floating above the water, since you never know when a kayaker or a paddleboarder will appear. This was the case back in May when a woman jumped from a bridge and landed on a kayaker, sending them both to the hospital.

So I can't jump off the bridges. Can I at least swim in Lady Bird Lake?

Also no. Back in 1964, two young girls drowned after wading into the lake, and almost immediately the city passed an emergency proposal banning swimming, bathing, or wading into the waters of Town Lake. For the past 54 years, the only reason a person can swim in Town Lake is if they are saving another person.

Other prohibited acts include fishing from a deck/ bridge, driving a gas-powered motor vessel, driving an electric boat with more than 5 horsepower, using a device that can launch/propel water balloons or other projectiles (on the lake or within 150 yards of the shore), and using/ riding an inflatable flotation device. Doing any of the things mentioned above can result in fines up to \$500.
