R.I.P. Chad Holt

A quintessentially Austin figure - subject of Bob Ray's 2010 documentary Total Badass, self-publisher of a music zine, legendary for a SXSW wristband counterfeiting scheme back in the early 2000s - Chad Holt passed away on Aug. 18. At the time of his passing, Chronicle staff



writer Kevin Curtin, a friend of Holt's, posted a remembrance, which we've excerpted here: "Chad Holt was a renegade of thought and deed. ... He was a one-of-a-kind writer/publisher with his annual Whoopsy zine in which he often formatted it like it was reviews of bands but it would just be stories of his sexual exploits or brutally honest musings that challenged the conventional ways people thought about life. In [the] last two issues, 2018 and 2019, he wrote about having ass cancer in his unique, put it all on the table, kind of way. ... He was what I've often aspired to be: a smart guy who does legendary mind-blowing dumb shit, but very few people are as brilliant as Chad."

UNDER FIRE Travis County District Attorney Margaret Moore and her First Assistant Mindy **Montford** are accused of attempting to "prevent or dissuade" one of eight rape survivors suing the city, county, local law enforcement and the D.A.'s office from pursuing the class action suit in a new lawsuit filed Wed., Sept. 11.

NO SERVICE Five percent of Austinites do not have home broadband services, according to a new study by the city and UT. While the number of residents living with high-speed internet has jumped from 92% in 2014 to 95% - making Austin "well ahead" of the national 65% average – the city is hoping to "bridge the digital divide," according to the Wednesday press release. Additionally, 76% of non-users said they didn't know enough about the internet to use it.

UNGOOGLE IT? Texas is one of 50 states whose attorneys general announced an investigation of tech behemoth Google for evidence of anticompetitive business practices, particularly of skewing ad searches to disfavor competitors.

MISSION ACCOMPLISHED The relentless Republican attacks on the **Affordable Care Act** have begun to achieve their short-term purpose: Reducing access for millions of Americans. For the first time, the 2018 national percentage of uninsured rose a half point, to 8.9%, and Texas increased its lead for the **most uninsured**, from 17.3% to 17.7% (5 million people). The long-term goal is to return to pre-ACA levels, when 17% (44 million nationally) were uninsured (22% of Texans).

KNOWN UNKNOWNS Democratic primary voters might start paying attention if they expect to end the reign of GOP incumbent Sen. John Cornyn. The Texas Tribune reports that its poll with UT found 66% of Dems either don't know or aren't sure of their primary U.S. Senate candidates. Among those: veteran and author MJ Hegar leads with 11%, state Sen. Royce West is second with 5% ... followed by a string of also-runners, including Austinite Cristina Tzintzún Ramirez, tied with Houstonian Sema Hernandez at 3%.

HANDMAID'S TALE Omaha and Naples, Texas, passed similar ordinances on Sept. 9 effectively **banning abortion** within city limits. Texas Right to Life's Katherine Pitcher told Naples City Council, which passed the ordinance 5-1, the new city law "does not contradict the Constitution," and is drafted to protect "preborn citizens" from abortion and the city from lawsuits.



Hanging Fire on Gun Control

AFTER YET MORE DEATHS, TEXAS LEADERS VOW TO DO ... SOMETHING

Like most Chronicle readers, I welcome Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick into the ranks of gun control advocates. You might have missed it

- bogus hurricane warnings and John Bolton's defenestrated mustache having saturated recent headlines - but the Lite Guy scored some coverage of his own last week. telling The Dallas Morning News that he thinks the time has come to require background checks on "stranger-to-stranger" gun sales.

"I'm willing to take an arrow" from the require a massive, governmental gun regis-National Rifle Association, Patrick told the

News' Robert Garrett - presumably, he would prefer not to have to dodge a few bullets, as have too many Texans recently in

El Paso, Odessa, and Midland (and many venues less notorious). He got more than he could wish for from the numbskulls at the NRA, who immediately issued a statement invoking those gun-grabbing demons Barack Obama and Michael Bloomberg, and declaring, "Criminalizing private firearm transfers would

tration scheme."

At one shot, the NRA assisted the mediasavvy Patrick in positioning himself ever so slightly to the left of the Republican mainstream on gun issues - still very far to the right of simple sanity, but a journey of 1,000 miles has got to begin somewhere. "Look, I'm a solid NRA guy," Patrick said, "but not expanding the background check to eliminate the stranger-to-stranger sale makes no sense to me and ... most folks."

Allow me a pianissimo note of skepticism. We await the substantive proposals supposed to be forthcoming from Patrick or from his frenemy, Gov. Greg Abbott, who has got to be ticked that with a single inter-

view, Patrick grabbed the GOP momentum from Abbott's gun violence task forces, commissions, head-scratching about mental health, summary executions, etc. with a bold presumption: "Someone in the Republican Party has to take the lead on this."

IN SEARCH OF SOME SENSE

The ever-optimistic Ed Scruggs of Texas Gun Sense, who is gamely participating in Abbott's latest "Texas Safety Commission" appointed to mull gun violence, welcomed Patrick's effusions. "Any talk about closing background check loopholes is positive," Scruggs said. If "any talk" becomes substantive legislative action by 2021 - our sclerotic state government's next scheduled official opportunity to do something, anything, after what will inevitably be another gun massacre or two, and many dozens of less-heralded gun deaths - it would undoubtedly be a belated victory for what even Patrick called "common sense."

The trouble with common sense, alas, is that if there were such a thing, everybody would have it - even our reflexively reactionary state leaders.

BEEN HERE. DONE THAT

The state's Democrats have not been silent in this latest moment of Texas tragedies, earnestly requesting the governor call a special session to address gun violence. Their specific, quite incremental remedies go beyond anything likely to be considered, let alone enacted, by GOP legislators, although No. 2 on their five priority items is in fact the closing of background-check loopholes like stranger-tostranger sales - which just might have served to obstruct the Odessa/Midland shooter, who reportedly had failed a legitimate background check but then bought his gun in a private sale. The other Dem proposals include: an "extreme risk" (aka "red flag") law (which may also have been applicable to the Odessa shooter); banning high-capacity magazines; limiting open carry of assault rifles; and most minimally of all, requiring the reporting of stolen guns to law enforcement.

THE TROUBLE WITH COMMON SENSE, ALAS. IS THAT IF THERE WERE SUCH A THING, EVERYBODY WOULD HAVE IT.

It's unlikely the Dems will get their special session, and even less likely that it would result in positive outcomes. The recently adjourned 86th Texas Legislature did take action on guns: It made them easier to acquire, own, and carry, including at schools and churches. Why we should imagine that a special session of the same legislators - commonsensical, or mostly not - would do any better, remains obscure.

Patrick's declarations, like Abbott's roundtables (and in fairness, Democratic press conferences), are less about actual legislation than about political positioning in advance of next year's elections. GOP incumbents hardly want a "gun control" session that would either require them to gun-pander or else get primaried in May, nor would their Capitol intransigence on any restrictions help them next November. And they count on the sheer, relentless ordinariness of gun violence to (once again) wear down the public's attention, until the next mass shooting.

When that happens - and it will - expect another round of consternation, task forces, moments of silence, commonsensical declarations. Just don't expect anything to change for the better.

Deadline Crunch

PROCESS FINISHED, CodeNEW SET TO DROP IN THREE WEEKS

City Council got their final staff briefing on the Land Development Code rewrite at a special called meeting Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 11. City staff explained their strategy on several specific topics:

- Existing market-rate affordable multifamily properties (older units that are affordable for those making 80% median family income or below) will keep their equivalent zoning in the new code, except they may be eligible for an affordability bonus;
- outside of transition areas, no properties will be upzoned, except if they opt into affordability bonuses;
- "unique zoning districts" (NCCDs, TODs, PUDs, etc.) will be left under the existing code, except transition areas around corridors that will be rezoned, so
- and affordable housing incentives are ... well, they're complicated, and we hope they'll work. But in the transition areas, as Council Member Alison Alter stressed and staff admitted, the broad upzonings work against the bonuses being used.

NCCDs will shrink, perhaps by as much as 50%;

Next up: A previously scheduled Council work session on Sept. 17 has been cancelled (and

replaced with a Sept. 18 special called meeting on the homelessness ordinances), but there'll be one more briefing – the week of Sept. 23, on Watersheds, the environment, and administrative sections – before the Oct. 4 public release of the draft Code and city-wide mapping. With just three weeks to nail down all the details, write, polish, proofread, organize, and produce (whew) what last time around was a 1,400-page document full of picky but important details, numbers, and cross-references (whew, again), it would seem there's no time left to second-guess assumptions or rethink priorities. On the other hand, this is the exact point at which the last of those details and numbers are being finalized especially in the mapping, I would presume - so everyone's trying to get in some last spin that might sway a decision on,

perhaps, whether your home is going to be zoned R3 or R4, or whether you can get rid of your parking space.

Judging from the Wednesday meeting and the Aug. 28 one on **transition areas**, it appears that staff is hewing pretty closely to the **Council directions** that were passed May 2 which skewed pretty extreme in some of their particulars. often on contentious 7-4 votes that indicate a strong resistance to the rule changes, especially in those center-city neighborhoods who are likely to be affected the most. So at this point, expect pretty drastic upzoning along corridors and broad reductions in on-site parking, to cite just two salient

> areas of dispute in the urbanist/neighborhood debate. On Oct. 4. Council and the public will see what that looks like on the ground. And at that point, we'll all see whether we're in for another round of 7-4 votes, or whether Council has the stomach for one last push for more consensus.

EISERLOH IN COUNTY ATTORNEY HUNT

There's now a second official candidate in the race for the Democratic nomination to succeed retiring Travis County Attorney **David Escamilla**. Tuesday afternoon, before about 50 people packed into the NeWorlDeli on Guadalupe, Assistant County Attorney **Laurie Eiserloh** joined Pflugerville criminal defense attorney **Dominic Selvera** as the only declared contenders; however, County Court-at-Law Judge **Mike Denton** (who retires from his bench on Friday, Sept. 13) and Austin Mayor Pro Tem **Delia Garza** have each said they are "seriously considering" the race and are expected to announce later this year.

Just before she spoke from a small stage, Eiserloh told the Chronicle that she decided to run in August, when she learned that County Court-at-Law Judge

Elisabeth Earle, widely expected to run, had decided not to do so. As a longtime civil attorney, Eiserloh has a lengthy résumé with the state, city, county, and nonprofits and, at first glance, seems centrally qualified for the office. Currently the leader of the county's employment law team,

where she's worked for nearly a decade, her broad experience also includes the city of Austin law department, private practice, the Texas Attorney General's Office, and (just out of UT Law) executive director of what was then the Lesbian and Gay Rights Lobby of Texas, now Equality Texas. She described as well volunteer work with El Buen Samaritano and the Trinity Center of St. David's Episcopal Church.

In addition to handling Travis County's civil litigation, the County Attorney's Office prosecutes criminal misdemeanors (often in the Courts-at-Law where Earle and Denton preside), and Eiserloh described several areas for improvement should she win the nomination (which is usually tantamount to winning the position in dark-blue Travis). She is highly aware, she said, that a misdemeanor conviction can affect a person's prospects in jobs, housing, and immigration status, and "too often those effects fall disproportionately on people of color and the poor." Among other approaches, she recommends better "pre-screening" arrestees for dismissal or diversion; "best practices for fairness" in handling suspects; and better training for young attorneys, particularly to defend against

"inherent bias." She added, "We also have to do better in handling family violence cases," including better communication and engagement with victims and witnesses.

Eiserloh lamented the Travis County Jail has become "too often the mental hospital of last resort," and recalled learning from a jail nurse that some welcome arrest because it means they'll receive mental health services. "We have to get better," she said.

Considering how to underwrite some of these changes, she noted that better pre-screening of arrestees

could free some institutional resources for other programs. But she also acknowledged that in some instances – support for mental health services, for example – "the state of Texas has a piece of this" that it is currently failing to deliver.

Eiserloh said that succeeding Escamilla would mean filling "some very big shoes," but that colleagues (including some on hand) had encouraged her to run, based on her ample qualifications. Asked about the prospects of facing Denton or Garza, she said, "They aren't running yet, but should they do so – I believe I'm the most qualified for this position." – Michael King

ON BUDGET, COUNCIL AGREES TO DISAGREE

With so much else on its horizon to vex and divide City Council (can you say land development code?), the special meeting to adopt the fiscal vear 2020 city budget went down on Tuesday, Sept. 10, without too much fuss. The two power centers on the dais (captained by Mayor Pro Tem Delia Garza and Council Member Greg Casar at one pole, CMs Kathie Tovo and Ann Kitchen at the other) did end up agreeing to disagree, and also to wait and see, about priorities that will be more sharply contested in the future. In the middle, Mayor Steve Adler, as is his wont,

sought consensus, and on the edge, CM Jimmy Flannigan - the lone vote against final adoption - continued to raise concerns about how fast Council aims to spend money in the shadow of next year's looming revenue cap.

In total, Council ended up spending \$4.6 million more than had been proposed by City Manager Spencer Cronk in his \$4.2 billion FY 2020 spending plan. About \$2.5 million of that was offset by higher-than-estimated property tax revenues, which the city's master budgeteer Ed Van Eenoo and his team turned into various amendments: the rest came from Council rejecting Fire Chief Joel Baker's attempt to bump up his staffing with 27 new command technicians.

Baker was the odd man out among the city's public safety chiefs, as Cronk and Van Eenoo allocated much of their new cap space to increase funding, as called for by justice advocates, toward mental health first response - Community Health Paramedics in Emergency Medical Services, training and expert staffing for the 911 call center, and expanding the Mobile Crisis Outreach Team, which works out of the Downtown Austin Community Court. What staff did not do was reduce the budget's appropriation for 30 new police officers to fund these enhancements, which is

> by Just Liberty, the Austin Justice Coalition, and others wanted, for policy as well as fiscal reasons: "We still do not know that we need these new officers. or what the 'community policing' work exactly is that we expect them to do," they wrote in a letter to Council on Sept. 5.

unsuccessful in their effort to reduce the new officer positions by four, with Casar noting the city is "trying to get to certain outcomes, not to certain numbers" in community safety. Police Chief Brian Manley acknowledged that APD will likely not hire any new officers in FY 2020, but insisted that he needs the money to pay overtime and the positions on the books to recruit the next cadet class. On his side, the Greater Austin

Crime Commission applauded Council's



standing firm; president Pete Winstead, echoing Manley, said in a statement that "growth is the No. 1 public safety issue in Austin," and that "taxpayer-funded studies reveal [APD] has fewer patrol officers than needed to keep up with calls for service." This battle will surely continue.

Other Budget Day largesse included raising pay for the city's open-water lifeguards and more funding for encampment cleanups, abortion support (also championed by Casar and Garza), outreach to ensure a complete count of Austinites in next year's census (an Adler priority), and wildfire mitigation (where CM Alison Alter took point, as her District 10 includes much of the city's interface with the Hill Country). "The budget Council has approved is responsible, innovative and focused on equitable solutions," said Adler in a statement Wednesday morning. - Mike Clark-Madison

Dueling Camping Bans on Tap

New public camping restrictions will be considered in two proposed ordinances at a special called Council meeting next week. The first one. drafted by Council Members Kathie Tovo and Ann Kitchen (and now co-sponsored by CMs Leslie Pool and Alison Alter), would prohibit camping, sitting, or lying on some streets altogether - including Congress Avenue, Sixth Street, East 11th and 12th streets, and parts of West Campus between MLK and 29th. Camping along "safe routes to school" would also be included in the proposal's prohibitions.

The second proposal, from Mayor **Steve** Adler and CM Greg Casar, was released shortly after Tovo and Kitchen's, and does not prohibit camping on specific streets. Instead, it clarifies what a prohibited encampment looks like: anything that does not provide a fourto five-foot "clear zone" along a "sidewalk, shared use path, or trail" would be considered in violation of the ordinance. An idea specifically from Adler would designate particular roadways with high volumes of pedestrian traffic – such as some blocks along Congress and Guadalupe - as subject to recently adopted rules governing parking for micro-mobility devices (e.g., scooters).

Both proposals agree that limitations should be placed on camping at transit stops, on sloped areas underneath highways, in flood plains, and near existing and future shelters offering homelessness services. Casar and Adler's proposal defines a radius for prohibiting camping around shelters (three blocks within the Central Business District and around the Austin Resource Center for the **Homeless**, and a quarter- to half-mile in the rest of the city). Tovo and Kitchen's proposal would also limit camping around shelters, but does not define an exact radius.

City, Austin FC Break Ground on New Stadium

Ground was officially broken at McKalla Place near the Domain in Northwest Austin Monday, Sept. 9, for the new "soccer park" - anchored by a 21,000-seat stadium - that will be home to Austin FC, yet another major milestone in the origin story of Austin's first major league sports team. The ceremony kicked off phase one of construction at the long-vacant city-owned property near the intersection of Burnet Road and Braker Lane, as outlined in the stadium deal between the city and the club finalized in December 2018. Assuming construction stays on schedule and the remaining portions of the site plan are approved by the city – and aren't in any way upset by the outcome of the largely moot but still-happening-anyway **Proposition A** referendum on November's ballot, originally intended to thwart the stadium deal - the \$242 million stadium for Major League Soccer's 27th franchise is set for completion by April 2021.


Mayor **Steve Adler** and eight members of the City Council (everyone except stadium deal foes Leslie Pool, in whose District 7 the site is

located, and Alison Alter) joined Austin FC impresario Anthony Precourt and – of course – Matthew McConaughey at the Monday groundbreaking to commemorate the occasion. Adler highlighted the nascent club's ability to unite our city - something we'll surely need as Austin gears up for another round of painful land-use debates and **School Changes** conversations (see "AISD, Remixed," p.22). "We still are a community that is segregated more than we should be." Adler told the crowd. "This team ... has the opportunity to really bring this community together in ways that iust don't happen frequently enough."

Now, if only Precourt, McConaughey, and the rest of the Austin FC/Two Oak Ventures ownership group would provide more detail on how we can actually get together at McKalla Place once the side takes the pitch, that would be awesome. The site's vague parking and transportation plans will remain fuzzy until a city-required traffic impact analysis is concluded - but the deadline for that isn't until a year or so from now. - Austin Sanders

Controversial Pipeline to Cross the Hill Country

Back on June 20, City Council adopted a resolution opposing the Permian Highway Pipeline, a natural gas line planned to transport methane from the West Texas Permian Basin (near Fort Stockton) to the Houston area for processing, then to the Gulf Coast, primarily for export. The resolution, authored by Council Member Leslie Pool and carrying the maximum four co-sponsors, passed unanimously on consent and without discussion - in a passing mention at the prior work session, Pool noted that advocates had been asked not to testify at the meeting because of the full agenda for the last meeting before Council's summer break.

Nevertheless, the Council resolution provides a litany of reasons to oppose the PHP, a 42-inch line that will cross the Texas Hill Country and the Edwards and Trinity aguifers. It cites the potential risk of excavation through the karst limestone of the aquifers, the likely damage to endangered species habitat (golden-cheeked warblers and salamanders), and worst-case scenarios of hydrocarbons leaking or spilling into "a major source of drinking water for two million people." Beyond those immediate threats, the resolution notes, lie the prospect of 2.1 billion cubic feet per day of new carbon emissions: "a quantity of hydrocarbons for export that, when burned, will produce more carbon pollution than the entire Austin area, which will contribute to climate

change with all its deleterious effects on the people of Austin and the world."

The resolution directed staff to study the potential impacts of the pipeline. The resulting Aug. 28 report by the Watershed Protection Department and Environmental Officer Chris Herrington ("Potential Water Quality Impacts") made two major conclusions: that the PHP indeed presents potential risks to the Edwards Aguifer, which it will cross in Hays County, and that there is very little Austin can do about it - because the line will pass south of Austin and Travis County, and because under state law, such pipelines are granted eminent-domain powers and are "specifically exempted from having to comply with the Texas Edwards Aguifer protection rules." There has been considerable opposition to the PHP, including legal action, from Hill Country jurisdictions, residents, and landowners - but opponents have failed to stop the project or force a rerouting of the pipeline. (Along with Austin, those opponents include San Marcos, Kyle, Wimberley, the Barton Springs/ Edwards Aguifer Conservation District, Hays Trinity Groundwater Conservation District, Save Barton Creek Association, and Wimberley Valley Watershed Association.)

The PHP is a joint project of Kinder Morgan Texas Pipeline (KMTP) and EagleClaw Midstream Ventures. Construction has already begun on the western segments and, according to Kinder Morgan VP for




Public Affairs Allen Fore, is expected to begin in the Hill Country segment as early as October for an overall completion goal of fall 2020. Fore says that while the company respects Austin's position, the PHP is outside the city's jurisdiction, and he disputes that it presents substantial environmental risks to the Edwards Aquifer or endangered species. Moreover, he said, pipelines have existed through the area for decades without significant problems. "It's the same product we have been transporting in the area for over 50 years," he told the *Chronicle*. "There are hundreds of miles of natural gas pipeline in the aquifer area currently. And I would ask what ... issues have there been with those natural gas pipelines, related to the aquifer? I'm not aware of any." Intrastate oversight is provided by the

Texas Railroad Commission, and Fore cites as well permitting review by the **U.S. Fish** and Wildlife Service (endangered species), the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (compression stations), and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (surface water crossings).

Despite the broad opposition, it appears that come next fall, there will be one more major pipeline running through the Hill Country, above the aguifer and in its recharge zones. On the largest question whether the endless burning of fossil fuels presents a growing threat to the health of the global ecosystem - the industry answer is: We are capturing "waste gas" from fracking operations that is currently being flared into the atmosphere. Either we burn it there, or burn it elsewhere. - Michael King

THE BETO-CASTRO-METER: WE **NEED TO TALK ABOUT JULIÁN ...**



For the third episode of So You Think You Can President? airing tonight (Thursday, Sept. 12) live from Houston - your friendly local Chronicle will be there - Beto O'Rourke and Julián Castro are both hanging on to the side of the 2020 Democratic starcruiser by their fingernails, standing next to each other on the outskirts of the stage at Texas Southern University. Though both are far from the top tier of three -Joe Biden, Bernie Sanders, Elizabeth Warren - Beto's once-loftier position means he qualified long ago for both this debate and next month's affair in Detroit, whereas Julián had to white-knuckle his way in late, along with Amy Klobuchar. The top 10 will all share just one stage tonight, but an 11th billionaire activist **Tom Stever** – has qualified for the October debate, after dumping an estimated \$10 million from his own purse into targeted digital advertising (far more than Castro's raised the entire cycle) to buy himself 2% support in early-state polls and game the **Democratic National** Committee's system. And Julián – or at least his fundraising machine - is not happy about it! "My heart just dropped," pleads the subject line of an email appeal sent Tuesday, in which the former San Antonio mayor and U.S. housing secretary turns his biographical message into a tiny violin: "I wasn't born a frontrunner. I've worked hard for everything

I've ever earned. I refuse to let millions in last-minute campaign cash drown us out. It would mean so much to me if I could count on your \$5 if you want to see my message get a fighting shot at the next debates. ..."

Yes, Castro deserves better than to beg on the digital streets for spare change - although Kirsten Gillibrand and Jay Inslee might like a word about that - and having to stand right next to Beto as O'Rourke gets to be the cool kid again might be irksome to him, and to his fans. But facts are facts, and Beto's rebound from the El Paso tragedy back into the 2020 mix has yet to abate. He's gaining on Biden in the latest Texas polling, will likely show back-on-track fundraising numbers for the third quarter ending Sept. 30, and millions of Americans are eagerly waiting for him to say "Fuck!" on live TV right in **David Muir**'s face. He has almost nothing to lose in the debates at this point; he'll make it all the way to Super Tuesday, and then be at least a mid-level Democratic rock star for years to come no matter what offices he seeks. What about Julián? Many already see his campaign as a race for the VP slot on the 2020 ticket; can he secure that with a solid performance in the debates, or if not, then can he raise the funds he (accurately) says he needs to soldier on to lowa, New Hampshire and beyond? 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


























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Three for TX-10

TRIO OF CANDIDATES VIE TO TAKE ON MCCAUL

The Far Northwest Progressives Democratic Club comes by its name honestly not quite in Cedar Park, the group hosts its meetings near the intersection of FM 620 and Lake Creek Parkway. That's not quite at the northwest end of the 10th Congressional District, which reaches a fingerling up beyond Volente - while the bulk of the district stretches back 150 miles east to Tomball and the Houston suburbs, and south beyond Columbus, having been radically gerrymandered to gather as many rural and suburban Republican voters as needed to comfortably re-elect eight-term incumbent Michael McCaul - until 2018.

In that contest, Democratic challenger Mike Siegel reached within four percentage points of McCaul. The surprising result has enticed a couple more Democrats -Shannon Hutcheson and Dr. Pritesh Gandhi - into the 2020 primary campaign. All three were hosted by the Progressives Monday night at the Charm BBQ Chicken restaurant, in a forum moderated by KXAN-TV political reporter Phil Prazan. Prazan posed the requisite questions on "governing philosophy," health care, gun violence, immigration, education ... and the candidates' responses, although differing in some details, defined a working range of the progressive spectrum of current Democratic policies.

Gandhi is a primary care physician, and emphasized his medical experience and his personal history in Houston and in Austin, where he has practiced with People's Community Clinic for several years. Hutcheson is a civil attorney with her own firm, and emphasizes her experience representing victims of violence and defending women's reproductive rights. Siegel is a former Austin assistant city attorney, educator, and labor organizer who points to his grassroots field operation as decisive in building a districtwide campaign. All three appear qualified to do the job - not a given in congressional races that sometimes attract an unwieldy scrum of amateurs (such as Siegel faced in the 2018 TX-10 Dem primary).

Siegel has the advantage of that campaign experience, and it showed in both his relaxed style (although all three candidates gamely endured reverberating microphones and a distracting bank of hyperactive TV monitors) and his anecdotal knowledge of the district. Over recent years, he's been actively involved in struggles over voting rights (Prairie View), health care (La Grange), and pollution (Fayette County). And he defined himself to the "left" (such as it is) on signature Democratic issues: he endorsed Medicare for All and the Green New Deal, while Hutcheson and Gandhi each described more incremental ways toward universal health care coverage, while supporting greater investment in renewable energy (Hutcheson), and a return to the Paris Accords and "zero net emissions by 2050" (Gandhi).

As for campaign profiles: Hutcheson emphasizes her working-class roots and her self-made professional career, co-founding her own law firm, and her long association with Planned Parenthood, the SAFE Alliance, and similar causes. Gandhi leans heavily on his medical service, especially to

the uninsured and (often) undocumented, and thus also gaining insight on issues of inequality and immigration. Siegel reiterates that he has already, as a candidate now for three years, been standing up to help constituents who feel unrepresented by McCaul - emphasizing that whoever wins the office must engage in those struggles persistently, not just at election time.

There were some small but significant differences - as indicated, on health care and environmental policy - with Siegel often returning to his emphasis on activism (e.g., "fighting the NRA" on gun violence) and Hutcheson and Gandhi a somewhat stronger emphasis on changes in policy mostly differences in nuance and in process. Occasionally challenged by Prazan with a reflexive "how would you pay for," for example, tuition-free higher education -Siegel responded that the \$60 billion estimate would be readily defrayed by repealing the Trump administration's "trilliondollar tax cut."

Speaking of Trump, Prazan asked for their positions on impeachment. Gandhi ("a whole list of impeachable offenses") and Siegel ("so many ways he's violated the law") said they'd support impeachment now, based on the already public evidence. Hutcheson said that while her "gut" has concluded the same, "speaking as an attorney" she wants a "full and complete investigation and public hearings" presented to Congress before formally endorsing it.

In perhaps the most important campaign question, Prazan asked if they would endorse and support whoever wins the Democratic primary. "Yes, without hesitation," said Siegel (joking that he would prefer his opponents join his campaign now). "Unequivocally yes," said Hutcheson, "more important than anything is to flip this seat." "Damn straight," concluded Gandhi. "Our American democracy depends - Michael King

RECA WRAPS ITS MIND AROUND AFFORDABILITY

Long a bugbear in the "Weird" parts of town (and often within these pages), the Real Estate Council of Austin has in recent years tried to reposition itself as less of a developers' lobby and more of a thought leader on Austin's growth and land use. Its annual RECA Exchange event being held today (Thursday) involves plenty of networking but also a Longhorn good time with UT athletic director Chris Del Conte previewing plans for the campus sports complex post-Erwin Center, updates from smaller cities around the region, and a roundtable of peer city leaders from Minneapolis. Seattle, and Nashville to talk about the challenges they and Austin face mobility, affordability, you know the list.

The luncheon speaker, **Spencer Levy** – chairman of Americas Research and senior economic adviser for CBRE, the largest commercial real estate firm in the world – is a frequent

talking head on the business cable channels on a variety of economic subjects, but for Austin, he's focusing on Topic A for the development community and policymakers here. "Real estate professionals are asking

how they can make a difference" in addressing local and global concerns, he says, "and affordable housing is that answer. We can't solve every issue, but we can solve this one." This applies to both "good guys"

building subsidized income-restricted housing and "bad guys" building market-rate units – as Austin's political influencers

have traditionally seen the field – since they're ultimately doing the same job and delivering similar products. "You won't have any trouble, anywhere, finding developers who

want to do density and walkability," he says. Austin is among the cities "doing the right thing," he says, in making its codes, regulations and policies amenable to producing the housing that the industry is ready to provide.

Levy's advice, to be sure, is something Austinites, including developers, have long heard but have yet to fully heed. For all

> the grief and frustration Austin feels about its rising costs and housing scarcity, "it's not nearly as severe as in other places" on the coasts. "Austin is certainly not a secondary market anymore," he says. "It's easier to build there, and there's a lot of

land outside Austin if it wants to grow out" - officially, of course, it doesn't - "but the infrastructure is not at that level. But it does have the ability to grow up; it's much easier to go vertical in Austin than elsewhere, and it can solve its [affordability] issue through urban density." Mike Clark-Madison





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AISD, Remixed

"School Changes" scenarios place equity front and center

At a "community visioning session" in early June, as part of the Austin Independent School District's "School Changes" process, parents turned out in force at Burnet Middle School in North Austin to press AISD officials for details on what kinds of changes the district aimed to make to their children's schools - or in many cases, their future schools - and how those changes might alter those children's future trajectories. It was one of the first opportunities for AISD families to engage with district officials as they worked on the multiyear School Changes plan, released in draft form last week, that could lead to a dozen school closures, a massive transformation of the kinds of programming schools offer, and a districtwide cultural shift.

The meeting also illustrated the uphill climb AISD - and Austin - will face in making the long-deferred "hard choices" the plan proposes to achieve greater equity in both access and out-

comes across the district. Many parents urged district staff not to disrupt existing vertical teams and feeder patterns the arrangements of campuses, programs, and attendance zones that determine the paths that Austin students follow

from elementary to

middle to high school.

Vertical teams (known in Austin by the names of their capstone high schools) are how AISD currently

offers continuity in academic programs and extracurricular activities, which in turn creates communities that bring together families who participate in those aspects of school life. But some school communities in AISD have much stronger, more cohesive vertical teams - Anderson being one of them. Unlike most other vertical teams in the district, Anderson currently has only one middle school (Murchison) feeding into its high school, so there is a great sense of loyalty among its families - along with the exclusivity that comes with a narrow path to Anderson High, one of the best in the

The Chronicle interviewed more than a dozen parents at the visioning session, all of whom were "Murchison parents" - a label for parents of elementary students within the Anderson vertical team as well as those now attending the Northwest Hills campus. They were very concerned about changes to attendance zone boundaries with the mostly unspoken but evident fear that their kids would get zoned out of the "good school" and into the "bad school."

That bad school was Burnet, where the session was taking place. Most couched their concern in indirect terms – talking of the benefits their child would gain by learning from middle school teachers who actively worked with high school colleagues to prepare students for higher-level coursework. Somewhat less subtly, they reminded district officials that they chose their current places of residence so their children would go to a particular school.

One couple, however, left the euphemisms at the door. The mother and father printed out a bar chart made by them, specifically for the event comparing



to make ends meet, compared to a child from a more affluent family, can be equally staggering. Managing those problems often leads to more important outcomes for those students than raising test scores.

But these parents did not share this concern. For them, and for many others throughout AISD, the calculation is often simpler: "Why should my kid have to go to a bad school so the district can say they're being more equitable?"

the district's teacher retention rate (people). expanding popular dual-language classrooms to more parts of the district (programs), and saving costs by closing aging campuses and investing in modern and modernized ones (places). Within each category are dozens of other proposals, some complementing others, aimed at achieving the same goals.

Closing schools has always been and was always bound to be the hardest pill for the

AISD community to swallow, but the draft scenarios squarely face the reality that the district has lost 6,000 students over the last five years and is projected to lose 7,000 more over the next decade.

Eleven scenarios include consolidating multiple school programs into single facilities, amounting to a total of 12 campus closures. (More details and map on p.24).

Out of the 12, seven sit east of I-35, a near-balance that reflects the immense pressure district planners are under to ensure that closures straddle Austin's socioeconomic East-West divide. However, nine of the schools have populations with more than 60% of students considered economically disadvantaged, with five at rates of 90% or higher. As Eastside education activists have already pointed out, none of the 12 schools are west of Lamar Boulevard. where one now finds those schools - like Murchison – serving the wealthiest parts of the district.

For each closure scenario, the district has laid out options to improve the "receiving schools" with facility upgrades, additional programming, or both. If Maplewood Elementary is closed, for example, the school's

Murchison and Burnet standardized (STAAR) test scores, the number of English language learners (ELLs) at each campus, the number of disciplinary actions

doled out at each, and the funding of each by AISD. Burnet, which has failed to meet state accountability standards in two of the last six school years, had lower STAAR scores, more ELLs and disciplinary actions, and a greater investment from the district.

Setting aside the questionable value of test scores for individual students as a measurement of a whole school's performance, their chart conspicuously left off a crucial metric: the percentage of economically disadvantaged students at each school, which for the 2018-19 school year was 21% at Murchison and 90% at Burnet. The difference is staggering, and the problems that can follow a child from a family struggling

REIMAGINE. REINVEST. REINVENT Convincing parents with high hopes for

their child's academic future that they can receive an enriching and engaging education at all AISD schools is one of the end goals informing the complex chess maneuvers that make up the School Changes process. On Thursday, Sept. 5, the district unveiled drafts for 39 scenarios that its leaders will use as a starting point as they attempt to transform the district's operations over several years and on several fronts - or, to echo the School Changes tagline, to "reimagine, reinvest, and reinvent." The planning process that began in earnest in January 2019 is slated to culminate in November with votes on the scenarios by the board of trustees.

Taken together, the scenarios reflect a comprehensive attempt to remedy district inequities within three broad categories: "people," "programs," and "places." Major actions in each of these include increasing

popular arts-focused curriculum would be transplanted to the nearby Campbell Elementary campus. Maplewood families would also have the opportunity to transfer to Blackshear Elementary, which also emphasizes fine arts, and which would offer a new digital media program for students in kindergarten through fifth grade. As with most of the closure scenarios, the future of the Maplewood campus is left undefined, although the draft document notes it could be converted into a "new, beneficial space for the community."

In all, staff projects that the proposed closures and consolidations will save the district about \$240 million in capital costs

(accrued over decades of deferred maintenance) and free up about \$10 million annually in AISD's operating budget to reinvest in other campuses and programs. To soften the sting of proposed closures, district officials have said the money and resources from a closing school will "follow the students" to their new school - meaning any operational dollars saved by closing Maplewood, for instance, would be reinvested into Campbell and Blackshear.

Attendance zone changes will also be considered throughout the entire district, not just in the closure scenarios. **AISD Operations Officer** Matias Segura boundaries could be tweaked to act as "relief valves" for overcrowded schools, but stressed that most of the changes would be minor: "We're not going to get a campus that's at 120 percent [capacity] down to 100 percent," he said. "That's not going to happen, and

we don't want to move kids just to move them."

Any boundary changes at all will cause a stir among parents, like those from Murchison, concerned about disruption to vertical teams, but district officials insist that their goal is to strengthen those teams and increase programming continuity within them. One example is a new initiative the district calls "Pre-K to Pre-Med." The program would focus on medical professions from pre-K (mostly through introducing young students to STEM curriculum) all

the way up to the Health Professions program offered at LBJ Early College High School, Students would engage in learning focused on "health, wellness, nutrition, and preventive care" as they progress from primary to secondary schools.

SHARED SACRIFICE?

But for other parents, the talk of merely "tweaking" attendance zones is not going far enough. "I was disappointed [that the district] didn't take a more radical approach to redrawing boundary lines," Vincent Tovar, a battle-hardened education activist in East Austin, told us of the scenarios. "The sacrifice should be shared all around

> the district, but I don't see that happening yet."

Others are less optimistic that it will happen at all. Kevin Foster, an AISD parent and UT professor, told us that the "basic framing" of the plan showed a lack of vision and strategy. By proposing the majority of school closures in East Austin, the district is basically ceding that territory to charter schools, which have moved aggressively into that part of the city, and accepting shrinking enrollment as reality instead of strategizing for how to grow schools. As well, the district is doing little to prevent economically disadvantaged students from bearing a disproportionate impact as a result of the disruptive closures.

Moreover, Foster said, the scenarios carry a goal ₹found "unspoken and unwritten" in decades of city planning: protection for affluent communities, with everyone else coming as an afterthought. "I

don't see how our thinking here is fundamentally different from the previous 150 years of Austin policymaking," Foster told us. "The plan looks like we made sure to protect the already privileged, and then do the best we can to help everyone else after the fact."

Several, including three AISD trustees, have pointed to the fact that two small elementary schools in affluent Austin neighborhoods - Barton Hills and Zilker - were spared in the scenarios, although Barton

PROPOSED CLOSURES AND CONSOLIDATIONS

- 1 & 2. Sims and Pecan Springs elementaries (consolidating with Norman): Norman students began attending class at Sims this school year while construction funded by the 2017 bond gets underway at the Norman campus on Tannehill Lane. When the renovated Norman campus reopens (as Norman-Sims) in 2021, students from Sims will attend school there, along with Pecan Springs students living south of 51st Street: the remainder of the students in the Pecan Springs attendance zone will attend Winn Elementary School.
- 3. Maplewood Elementary (consolidating with Campbell and Blackshear): The Maplewood campus will close, and the facility will be converted into a "new, beneficial space for the community." Maplewood's students and arts-focused curriculum will eventually move to Campbell, which will undergo a modernization project, slated for completion in 2024. Campbell students will be able to stay there with the new Maplewood programming or transfer to Blackshear Elementary (with its own modernization completing in 2024), which will be a fine and performing arts academy with a digital media program.
- 4. See 13.
- 5. Webb Middle School (consolidating with **Dobie):** Webb will close, and its students will be transferred to the modernized Dobie campus, set to open in 2024.
- 6. Brooke Elementary (consolidating with Linder and Govalle): Brooke will close, and its students living north of Lady Bird Lake will be transferred to Govalle, which is undergoing a renovation set for completion in early 2020. Students living south of Lady Bird Lake will attend Linder, with its own renovation project set for completion in 2024.

- 7. Palm Elementary School (consolidating with Perez): Palm will close, and its students will be sent to Perez, with some Perez students reassigned to Langford. Perez and Widén (along with Paredes Middle School) will become "outdoor leadership schools," with the incorporation of nearby parks and green spaces into the culture and curriculum at each school.
- 8. Metz Elementary (consolidating with Sanchez): A modernization project at Sanchez will complete in 2021, at which point Metz will close and its students will transfer to Sanchez, less than half a mile away.
- 9. Ridgetop Elementary (consolidating with Reilly): Ridgetop will close and its students will move into a modernized Reilly campus, set to open in 2024. Students will participate in a two-way dual-language program, where they will learn in either English, Spanish, or Mandarin.
- 10. Pease Elementary: AISD would close its last Downtown campus, the oldest in the district, and its students - who are all transfers from other attendance zones - would be able to move to Zavala, east of I-35, after facility improvements there. A deed restriction on the property, enforced by the state, requires that the facility be used for educational purposes.
- 11 & 12. Joslin and Dawson elementaries (consolidating with St. Elmo and Galindo): Joslin and Dawson will close, and their students will go to renovated campuses at St. Elmo or Galindo, both opening in 2024. St. Elmo's new attendance zone includes families south of Ben White Boulevard; Galindo's new zone will cover the area north of Ben White.

2022, students in attendance zones for Jordan, Overton, Blanton, the northern edge of Pecan Springs, and the southern edge of Winn will be zoned for the new middle school (likely to be located near Mueller). Attendance zones for the new school will be reevaluated closer to its opening

The all-girls Sadler Means will close, and students will have the option of attending Ann Richards or their new assigned school. Resources that would have gone to Sadler Means will be reinvested into Dobie, Lamar, and Martin middle schools.

Hills had been identified for closure in 2011. As District 2 Trustee Jayme Mathias asked at the board's meeting on Sept. 9, "If small schools are inefficient in East Austin. are not small schools inefficient in other parts of Austin? How can it be that Zilker and Barton Hills are not on the list of [closures]?" Trustee Amber Elenz, whose District 5 includes the two schools, acknowledged that the schools had small student populations compared to others, but pointed out that both are considered overenrolled by district standards, whereas the School Changes scenarios identify campuses that are both small and underenrolled for closure.

The Monday meeting allowed the board to have its first public discussion of the scenarios since their release last week. Trustees representing parts of the city's "eastern crescent" - Mathias, District 1's LaTisha Anderson, and D3's Ann Teich -

echoed some of the concerns coming from the communities they represent: why their districts have the majority of proposed closures, and why the scenarios didn't include a more transformative approach to redrawing attendance zone boundaries. (Segura said more details on boundary adjustments were coming, but staff needed clearer direction on which scenarios the board favored before proceeding because each scenario could have a different impact on boundaries.)

Most of the board discussion focused on specific scenarios, with trustees seeking to understand how each would impact school communities. Anderson, for instance, wondered why Northeast ECHS (formerly Reagan High) was identified for possible conversion to a grade 6-12 campus and wanted more detail on what that transformation would look like for families, staff, and faculty. Teich took issue with how the proposed closure of Webb Middle School was rolled out; the school community and staff were not informed until late in the day Thursday, just hours before media reports revealed the proposed campus closure. Webb has been engaged in developing a specialized improvement plan intended to reinvent the campus and its culture. But now the faculty, staff, and families are unsure of what will come next, given that the school could be closed in 2024. Teich told district staff at the meeting that if school communities were not more involved in the plans going forward, implementing them successfully would be impossible. "We need to do more internal and external community engagement," she said, especially at a school like Webb that is focused on its future.

HEADING OFF ANOTHER FIRESTORM

The recurring call for persistent and thorough community engagement appears to be one that AISD is heeding seriously. Everyone involved remembers the unmitigated disaster of eight years ago, when the firestorm over AISD's list of schools to be closed, none of whose communities had seen any engagement or been asked for their input beforehand, led in part to the resignation of then-Superintendent Meria Carstarphen, who now leads Atlanta's public schools. Although the list of schools on the chopping block has not changed much since 2011, AISD has tried to be much more deliberate about involving the community in its School Changes process.

First came the district's Budget Stabilization Task Force, which concluded its work earlier this year and focused on the need to right-size AISD in the face of prospective multimillion-dollar ongoing deficits. Trustees then established guiding principles to be used when making decisions regarding school changes; district staff held workshops, visioning sessions, and finally "think tanks," where volunteers spent seven hours

analyzing data, survey results, and comments to brainstorm ideas that Segura's team used to generate the 39 scenarios. This ongoing engagement aimed to provide sufficient opportunities for the community at large to participate, without giving traditional interests and AISD power centers a chance to dominate the conversation.

According to AISD, the listening is not over. On Friday, Sept. 6, Superintendent Paul Cruz told reporters that now, with the draft scenarios being made public, it was time for "dialogue and discourse" with the community. When pressed specifically on how the current process would improve the district's poor track record on that front, Cruz said, "We're going to meet directly with schools, teachers, and parents. ... It will be community conversations, going directly to impacted communities to talk about the 'why'" of the plan.

Board President Geronimo Rodriguez answered the same question with an acknowledgment of past failures. "We can always do

better," he said, praising the \$150 million now being invested in Eastside schools as part of the \$1.05 billion 2017 bond program. For Rodriguez, the son of migrant farm workers, the needs of marginalized communities "are top of mind. A big question for the board is, 'What is our definition of equity?' That's what school changes are all about - making sure that every child has an opportunity to graduate college-, career-, and life-ready."

Hawley pointed to one scenario in particular as an illustration of AISD's seriousness about acknowledging its institutional role in perpetuating historical inequities among Austin's white, black, and brown residents, and how they are actively working now to rectify that history. The "Districtwide Cultural Proficiency and Inclusivity" scenario is defined as "a comprehensive, multi year plan to ensure all students - regardless of race, gender, language, ability, sexual orientation, gender identity, religion, and other human differences - will be led, taught and supported by culturally proficient teachers, staff and administration."

Hawley does not see this scenario as a mere gesture toward a worthy goal that's impossible to actually attain. With faculty and staff better equipped to understand their own cultures and those of the students they teach, she said, students will feel a greater sense of belonging at school.

Moreover, Hawley explained, true cultural proficiency creates understanding of power dynamics between cultures and their effects on students. "Particularly if you're from a culture that has dominant power," she says, "you understand your position and adverse or positive impact on people who don't share your power."

These positions will sound radical to some

and long overdue to others, but the district is clearly eager for someone with Hawley's experience, expertise, and vision to weigh in on how it should proceed down its daunting path. Hawley told us that since she officially started in August – coming from Austin Community College, where she spent nearly a decade in similar roles as part of an education career stretching back 30-plus years – she has spent more than 70 hours in School Changes meetings, poring over district data with other officials, and pushing for a systematic culture shift at the organization.

Whether Hawley, Cruz, Rodriguez, and other AISD leaders can bring the rest of Austin on board remains to be seen. Parents at schools marked for closure are already digging in and ready to fight to keep their campuses untouched. For those parents, the district says they are listening to their feedback. "Not everybody is going to be happy with what we decide," Hawley said. "But if parents take away one thing from what we're doing, it should be that we are listening and co-creating solutions with them." ■

A "PROCESS OF RESTORATION"

"Equity" can be a squishy word, with as many definitions as people defining it, but for Stephanie Hawley, AISD's first-ever equity officer, the answer is clear. "Equity-mindedness is always looking at the margins to see who isn't benefiting from the system," Hawley told us in her office at AISD's new HQ in South Austin. "Who are we not serving? How are we not building on their strengths? We'll know we've achieved equity when [a student's] success and the way [they] fare is no longer predictable based on race or any other human difference."

Hawley hopes to realize that goal at AISD by retraining the entire organization, from Cruz's executive team down to the classrooms and campus support staff, to approach student learning in a "culturally proficient" way. That includes acknowledging the legacy and reality of segregation in Austin. "Historically, this is a very racist city," she said, "and unfortunately, this school district is a part of that system. But

Lingering Questions

Artist Michael Ray Charles returns to Austin with new work that, as ever, leaves us asking ourselves what we see

The artist spreads the paint deliberately but quickly, filling in the sketched-out semicircle with a bright shade of red. As the shape is no larger than his hand, he needs only a few strokes to complete the task. But then he takes a few steps to his left and there's another semicircle, so he repeats the motions, filling it in. And when that one's done, he takes some steps up a ladder and fills in one that's higher than the others. When you're as close to the canvas as the artist is, the painting of each individual shape appears a small thing. Step back, though, and dozens of outlined half-moons come into view, spread across an epic canvas 19 feet tall. Seeing the whole of it, you become aware of the true scope of the work. What's happening here is colossal.

As it is with this work of art – created specifically for the current exhibition at the Umlauf Sculpture Garden & Museum and for the gallery's back wall – so it is with the work's creator, Michael Ray Charles. Standing in this intimate space containing some 20 paintings and prints by Charles, you might conclude that this solo show is

modest, small. Step back, though, and take in all its elements – Charles' three decades of making art, his long history in and connections to Austin, his illustrious international reputation, and the exhibit's timing – and you see that "Michael Ray Charles" the show is something major, massive.

Many locals might have lost sight of Charles' prominence during the long time he lived here, much of it as a quiet presence teaching art at the University of Texas. You need to go back 22 years for the last show of his that made a big impact here: a retrospective at the Austin Museum of Art (now the Contemporary Austin) that took an extensive look at Charles' first decade as an artist. It was packed with the bold and daring, thoughtprovoking and unsettling images that were already earning him widespread attention then: images linked to stereotypes of African Americans (coal-black skin, outsized ruby lips, watermelons) coupled with loaded text ("The Dawgboy Alive and Well," "White Power," "Hello, I'm Your New Neighbor," "Beware"), blacks from American pop culture recast in different roles (Aunt Jemima as Wonder Woman and Marilyn Monroe, Sambo as Mickey Mouse and the Pillsbury Doughboy). With Charles appropriating the style of advertisements, circus posters, and magazine covers from the mid-19th through the mid-20th century, his works layered white nostalgia for earlier, "simpler" times onto oppressive racial attitudes of the past and present.

The work generated strong responses from people who saw it, and interest and acclaim from those in the art world. Charles was among the first artists to be spotlighted in PBS's Art21: Art in the 21st Century. His art began to be exhibited in Europe as well as across the U.S. and was acquired for collections far and wide, from the Museum of Fine Arts. Houston to the Museum of Modern Art. In the exhibit "Men of Steel, Women of Wonder." the Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art included one of its paintings by Charles alongside works by Jim Shaw, Enrique Chagoya, Llyn Foulks, Vincent Ramos, Norman Rockwell, Pope.L. Peter Saul, and Laurie Anderson. (Aside: Charles, who saw the show when it was presented at the San Antonio Museum of Art, says he was thrilled to be part of it. "I never thought I'd have work with that kind of lineup.") Five years ago, Charles left UT for the University of Houston. Last year, he received a major art-world honor: the Rome Prize, with which he spent an extended period of time this past year in Italy.

Now, Charles is back in the States, and the exhibition at the Umlauf is not just the first showing of his work since his return, but also his first solo exhibit in the U.S. in 18 years – a fact that even Umlauf curator

Katie Robinson Edwards didn't know until the week the show was being installed. That the Umlauf – and by extension, Austin – has scored this kind of achievement with an artist of international stature

is significant. And adding to the import is that said artist is creating a site-specific piece for the show – a piece, it's worth noting, that's in the vein of a painting Charles made for an exhibition of work by 2018-19 Rome Prize fellows. That was also a floor-to-ceiling work painted on canvas with a weight and texture suggesting sailcloth. On it, Charles placed the detailed silhouette of an old sailing ship, only painted on every surface were faces – black faces, dozens of

them overlapping one another and many with red semicircles over their mouths, red semicircles that call to mind watermelon slices. The image alone has a haunting power, and in the Umlauf gallery that power will only be magnified by its size, by the way it will loom over the viewer who comes into its presence – especially now, on the 400th anniversary of enslaved Africans being brought to Virginia.


Other works in "Michael Ray Charles," while smaller, are also likely to haunt viewers, each in its own way. To the right of the site-specific work is a line of paintings in which Charles utilizes imagery from the past in provocative ways, often by juxtaposing one with something unexpected: a red-checkered tablecloth straight out of a cheerful diner of old, on which is placed a nose, a tongue, an eveball, a severed finger: the face of a grinning clown from an old circus poster - white greasepaint; red nose, lips, and eyebrows; yellow cap; ruffled collar - but sliced in half and set on top of a Confederate flag; an empty rowboat, behind which is a Jolson-esque figure in blackface. They grab the eye and do not easily turn it loose, and they keep your mind spinning.

To the left is a series of seven prints that Charles produced at Austin's Flatbed Press with master printer Veronica Ceci. In the series, titled *Every World is a Head, Every Head is a World*, the first six prints feature floral bouquets, the colors slightly faded as if they came off an antique greeting card, and they appear in various positions around the head of a black child: in small bunches, barely touching the head; in a thick stream, almost swallowing the head; shaped like an

Afro atop the head; sitting below the head; and so on. But in the seventh, the flowers are gone, replaced by the face of the black child and others, covering the entirety of the paper. (They're much like the faces

covering the ship in the large work.) On the day I visited, Charles took a break from painting to discuss his thoughts behind the series. He'd been looking at images from the mid-19th century and their borders, and it got him thinking about concepts of romance and beauty and beautification. In exploring them, he saw a progression from romance with oneself, in one's own mind, to concepts that entangle the head to the question, "If you can conceive beauty in your mind, can



you conceive your body within that beauty?" That progressed to ideas of otherness and coexisting with others. "And in this final print," he said, "I think there's a lingering question: What is beauty?"

That's a complicated question, one with no pat answer. It requires us looking - looking *deeply* – and thinking about what we've seen

and also what we think, and how we, and the society we live in, regard and treat people. It isn't black and white, and, of course, it is black and white. And that's so much of what makes Michael Ray Charles an invaluable artist for this country in this time. He makes us look. He leads us to the hard questions and makes us ask ourselves who we truly are.

Anybody Holmes?

The joy in Austin Playhouse's Holmes and Watson is seeing the good doctor deduce which of three Sherlocks is real

There's no killing Sherlock Holmes.

A multitude of miscreants and malefactors have tried – by rifle, revolver, butcher's cleaver, hellhound, et al. - with no success. Even Holmes' creator failed in the attempt. In 1893, after two novels and two dozen short stories left him weary of the deductive genius, Arthur Conan Doyle resolved to rid himself of Holmes and in "The Final Problem" threw him off a cliff. The sleuth tumbled into Switzerland's Reichenbach Falls, locked in mortal combat with his newly created archenemy: Professor Moriarty, the "Napoleon of crime." But the public hue and cry over Sherlock's death was so intense that eight years later, Doyle undid it, penning a tale in which Holmes miraculously reappeared, alive, and resumed his

Jeffrey Hatcher uses the character's death and resurrection as the jumping-off point for his original drama Holmes and Watson. In it, the demise of the detective has sparked a firestorm of hysteria, with scores of people claiming to be Holmes and his companion/ chronicler having to investigate them and assure authorities they're not. The play

crime-solving career.

follows Dr. Watson to a remote asylum in Scotland to check out a trio of such claimants, and it might be more aptly titled Watson and Holmes, for while the good doctor is outnumbered three to one by Sherlocks, he's the one in the spotlight, sifting through clues, interrogating suspects, and concocting plans to find a solution to the mystery.

And make no mistake, there is a mystery within this tale. Unlike the 2018 Will Ferrell/John C. Reilly film of the same name or some treatments of Holmes and Watson seen on

area stages in recent years, this is no spoof. Hatcher, whose affection for Conan Doyle's tales goes back 50 years and who has written the characters in two other plays and a film, wants to do right by them. So Holmes is brilliant and crafty, with a superior air (in all of his incarnations here): Watson is forthright, loyal, and courageous; and they're drawn into an adventure built around a puzzle, which must be solved by

keen observation and deductive reasoning. Obviously. this puzzle involves the three Sherlocks, but it also concerns what actually happened at Reichenbach Falls, what other sinister plots Moriarty had in place before that fateful encounter, and who else might be involved. Hatcher parcels out clues much like Conan

> Dovle, and his are often as difficult to catch and decipher as those in the canon. But he provides a thrill in the chase – that Sherlockian spirit of "The game's afoot!" so even if you aren't racing Watson to the solution, his pursuit is excitement enough. In Austin Playhouse's production, much of the fun is in the gravity. As our Watson, David Stahl takes every aspect of the case as seriously as testimony in a murder trial.

Never mind that the three Sherlocks here bear no physical resemblance to one another or that there's no good reason for his Watson not to be able to recognize his friend of 10 years at a glance. Stahl takes no notice; he locks himself inside the story, where the stakes are life-and-death, and in doing so, he grounds a tale that could easily slip into campy melodrama. Moreover, he imbues Watson with a sincerity and resourcefulness that win our admiration and make us want him to succeed even though he isn't Sherlock. (Speaking of

the incomparable sleuth, Rick Roemer, Huck Huckaby, and Scott Shipman all appear to enjoy taking a pull on Holmes' Meerschaum pipe; all convey the same exceptional intelligence and pridefulness, though each shades them in his own way.) Alongside Stahl is Toby Minor's Dr. Evans, the asylum director, who essentially plays Watson to Watson's Holmes, deeply invested in the proceedings and following every development with bated breath.

Which is pretty much what we do, too, AP Producing Artistic Director Don Toner keeps the intermissionless show at a brisk clip, the better for Hatcher's mystery to stay one step ahead of the audience, just as Sherlock does Inspector Lestrade. That hapless policeman doesn't appear here, but Hatcher gives a tip of the deerstalker to a host of other incidents and characters in the canon. They're added delights for those who know the original adventures, but Holmes and Watson is accessible to those who never spent a day at 221-B Baker Street. All that's required to enjoy this show is the love of a mystery, an anticipation for the next clue, and a delight in every twist. As someone once said, elementary.

MY BEST FRIEND got gay married last weekend and it was an absolutely beautiful reminder of the importance of chosen family and queer villages. Blood families are complicated, and while I'm certain no two are the same, I faced numerous reminders during the wedding that so many of us share similar familiar struggles – from the belief that we don't deserve to be loved to the complicated



navigation of unhealthy family dynamics. Trust was a common talking point, as it should be, seeing as trust (IMPO) is the most crucial relationship ingredient, because without trust, how can you ever achieve a meaningful, lasting connection? But it's not just romantic relationships that thrive on trusting one another; it's also the stability bone of those villages. It's knowing that we'll show up for one another, from entrusting toddlers to your friends' care to making sure everything is where it should be; to ensuring a flawless feeling, even if a group of you are holding the seams together behind your backs. For those of us who struggle with our families, watching your chosen people come together to support you is powerful. Which is why, throughout the weekend of preand post-wedding happenings, I found myself saying over and over, "It takes a village." That, I believe, is a survival tool mastered by the queer community: a safety net we've constructed for one another because we've seen the breakdowns and realized nothing survives in silos.

In 2006, Chronicle Arts Editor Robert Faires wrote that, in Austin, one-person theatrical vehicles seem to "come in waves," (with the strongest occurring toward summer's end), It's an apt observation that remains true 13 years on. For me, riding 2019's solo-show wave meant experiencing a whirlwind of spirited, women-driven performances. Having already reviewed Holland Taylor's impactful Ann Richards biography Ann and Laura de la Fuente's sketch-comedy extravaganza Liz Behan: One Woman at Dusk, it seemed fitting to make it a trilogy with British expat Maggie Gallant's lively one-woman show Hot Dogs at the Eiffel Tower.

An unconventional autobiography, the piece chronicles its creator's true-life discovery of being adopted as an infant and her

subsequent search for her birth parents. Hot Dogs started as a 25-minute one-act that premiered at the 2006 FronteraFest Short Fringe and focused on the comedian reconnecting with her birth mother. Today, with the benefit of a decade-plus hindsight and new developments in her search, Gallant centers her hourlong revival on the surprising discovery of her French birth father, or "French Papa," and his true identity.

Onstage, Gallant relives her formative years with the dry wit and relatable irreverence of a teenage skaz protagonist. Her many lived experiences ultimately form a captivating whole, one fraught with enough twists and turns that, were actual diary entries, letters, and photographs not projected onto the stage's back screen, one might assume this tale was a flight of narrative fancy.

While distinctly personal, Hot Dogs is anchored by universal themes of curiosity and hope that evoke the simple yet powerful human desire to belong. Under the direction of Hyde Park Theatre Artistic Director Ken Webster, the tale feels well adapted to Hyde Park's intimate stage, allowing Gallant's brand of slow-burn storytelling to ferment into a balanced blend of cheekiness and honesty.

Gallant's dramatic strength (which Webster milks for all it's worth) is her unvielding eye for life's silver lining, something which prevents the show's darker moments from permeating the invisible, 10-foot radius of comedic energy that seems to surround Gallant at all times – even when she's offstage. (Chatting with her after the show felt less like a conversation and more like a continuation of the presentation; her performance style is just that true-to-life.)

Interestingly enough, the show's main dramatic revelation -Gallant learning her birth father's identity (which I won't spoil

> here) – in reality, occurred some years after Hot Dogs' FronteraFest premiere. Though her quest to find "French Papa" ends with a certain disappointment, one can only appreciate the novelty of a play dynamic enough to change alongside its performer's formative life-moments - especially when that performer is as affable as Gallant.

This summer's wave of solo shows, for me. ends with a narrative seemingly destined to carry on, as Gallant's story isn't over yet. Based on our post-show conversation, her trek toward self-discovery is an ongoing process. Though her continuing quest might not yield a second rewrite, Gallant's ability to synthesize and convey meaningful takeaways from her unique lot in life makes this show worth engaging. Hot Dogs at the Eiffel Tower's beauty lies in its ability to stand tall as its own selfcontained package, one that brings truth to the adage: "It's not about the destination, but the journey" (or in this case, the individual our hero became along the way). - Trey Gutierrez





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THE SECRETS

WE KEPT

by Lara Prescott

You'd think the most alluring element in the title of the debut novel by Michener Center for Writers graduate Lara Prescott would be the "secrets." There are, to be sure, plenty of fascinating ones to uncover in The Secrets We Kept - secrets of infidelity. espionage, dissent, identity, and trauma but it's the titular "we" that ends up having more weight. The sisterhood that Prescott

initiates the reader into in this Cold War story, at once workaday and mythic, is one you're loath to leave even when the story has come to its close.

The Greek chorus that opens the novel is made up of the perpetually overlooked and underappreciated: the secretaries in the CIA's typing pool. Their memories invite us into Washington, D.C., at the outset of the 1950s, where myriad plans to undermine the Soviet Union are being hatched - the newest one being to use the novel Doctor Zhivago as anti-communist propaganda. While most of the secretaries end their workday at five o'clock, two have extracurricular duties. The daughter

of Russian immigrants and the newest addition to the typing pool, Irina has an ability to be inobtrusive that makes her a candidate for being a carrier - the kind of spy who makes document pickups and drop-offs that leave no one the wiser. Sally, who becomes Irina's trainer (and has big Joan-from-Mad Men energy, by the way), is a spy of a more seductive breed, but she recognizes in Irina a similar sense of humor, hunger for the work, and queer desire. And all the while, across the Atlantic, the love story behind the love story the CIA hopes to disseminate is entering middle age. Olga, the longtime

mistress of Zhivago author Boris Pasternak. survives state violence and makes a life on the fringes of her lover's life, all the while working to protect her family and bring his book to publication.

There's a discretion Prescott maintains throughout The Secrets We Kept, perhaps appropriate given the work and circumstances of her protagonists - she never prescribes an

> absolute truth when she can give you the big picture and the stories that gently contradict one another and let the reader draw their own conclusion instead. There's readerly pleasure in being trusted to have a keen eye and considerable storytelling strength in the approach as well. Putting Soviet fearmongering and the Lavender Scare - when the U.S. government went to great lengths to root out, fire, and blacklist LGBTQ employees side-by-side could have felt heavy-handed. By letting us discover the infuriating, cruel hypocrisy of it for ourselves, Prescott makes the comparison feel new and vital.

There's a lot endured by

the women of The Secrets We Kept - professional disrespect, governmental menace, sexual assault, all on top of the indignity of their accomplishments being swept under the rug - but astonishingly, this isn't a novel as bleak as a Russian winter. Hope isn't something anyone comes by lightly, Prescott suggests - its maintenance requires imagination, fortitude, and enduring love - but she's assembled a group of heroines with all three in spades. - Rosalind Faires

Levelland was named for the surrounding topography, but it got its nickname for the public art on walls around the county seat of **Hockley County.**

The Panhandle town 31 miles west of Lubbock calls itself "The City of Mosaics" because of 13 murals made with glass and clay

The art project began in 1968 when South Plains College professor **Don Stroud** created a mosaic for the lobby of the school's fine arts building. The art teacher purchased the glass tiles in Mexico for the colorful mosaic of wild mustangs.

Over the next 50 years, mosaics were added on other buildings on the college campus, the hospital, the chamber of commerce building, and a medical clinic. The latest was done in 2018 on the Levelland Fire Department building.

The subject of a James McMurtry song, Levelland was originally surveyed by C.W. Post in 1912. The cereal magnate wanted to turn the Panhandle plains into a utopia of grain fields to supply his breakfast food company. He also founded the town of Post south of Lubbock.

Levelland didn't begin to be developed around agribusiness until 1921. It's said that the first county commissioners court met in a Cadillac because of the lack of adequate buildings.



Perhaps the most famous thing to happen around Levelland was a series of **UFO sightings** in November 1957. Several motorists. including the sheriff and fire chief, reported seeing an egg-shaped object emitting a blue glow that caused their automobiles to shut off. The U.S. Air Force said the cause was ball lightning from a storm.

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Review: Sugar Pine Cafe

CHARMING NORTH AUSTIN JAPANESE RESTAURANT BOASTS ONIGIRI AND HOMEMADE ICE CREAM by Jessi Cape

Every now and again, a new restaurant pops onto the Austin scene and just about everyone - from "influencers" to consumers spending their hard-earned dollars - is thrilled. The space is welcoming and lovely, with its design boasting a special attention to detail and nuances that separate it from the pack. The menu is streamlined and every dish is not only aesthetically pleasing, but impressively well-executed. The service is top-notch. whether full table or counter, from kitchen to front-of-house. And when all of those factors lump together at an approachable and reasonable price point, well, it's a slam-dunk review. If we gave star ratings, that would be a five out of five (what say you, reader?). Such is the case with Sugar Pine Cafe.

In June, the small North Austin eatery (off Research Boulevard, not far from the original Ramen Tatsu-ya) opened to much acclaim, with rave Instagram posts and local media coverage out the wazoo – even before the menu was wholly available online. (Sugar Pine's owners also own both locations of CoCo's Cafe, which specializes in pearl drinks, iced teas, and a large menu of Taiwanese fare.) Zip forward a

few months to a steady stream of pleased customers spanning a wide berth of demographics.

The space itself is dreamy. Flying yellow canaries swoop down the adorable accent wallpaper, green plants (including many up-forsale succulent arrangements) adorn linear spaces throughout, rope-wrapped support poles and sleek wood-grained tables and bright vellow chairs pair with glossy black accents, and the whole room is filled with windows ushering in natural light. A dog-friendly patio features a fountain, and a blue velvet sitting area is perfect for chatting over iced red tea, craft beer, wine, sake, mead(!), or a drink from the full espresso bar. The counter service staff, on each visit a welcoming experience, delivered each item to the table. And while nothing here is complicated - that's a big part of the charm - it's a way to introduce alternative (though still traditional) Japanese fare to those branching out from a standardissue California sushi roll point of view.

That brings us to the onigiri.

About a third of the menu is Sugar Pine's dedicated section of made-to-order Japanese

cellophane, making it even more portable.

The rest of the food menu is split between appetizers/small plates and bento sets. Oh, that shrimp tempura! Three large, plump, and per-

fectly tempura-ed shrimp with dipping sauce offer a twinge of sweetness and just the right amount of salty crisp. I adore this simple appetizer. The large cubes of salt-and-pepper tofu are similarly delightful in their blond fried exteriors and tender insides. The standout starter is certainly the cold soba (buckwheat) noodles, which arrive in two smallish portions - great as an app for two or light entrée for one - with sides of sauce, bonito flakes, and a trifecta of tiny flavor boosts: apple, wasabi, and ginger. (Note: It's not cereal - dip the noodles, don't pour on the sauce.) The bento sets arrive on a tray with a variety of small accoutrements like seaweed salad, steamed and/or pickled veggies drizzled with hot chile oil, miso soup, and seasoned rice; each set comes with a tiny, gluten-free almond cookie. I hate the word "craveworthy," but my favorite such dish here is the juicy chicken

katsu (breaded cutlet) set with creamy, robust Japanese oyster mushroom and potato curry – a steal of a deal at lunch. The fry on the chicken karaage is surprisingly lighter than most. Other sure-bet options are the tempurafried eggplant and kabocha squash, grilled salmon, and their twist on everybody's pub fare favorite, fish & chips with Atlantic cod and taro. (Real quick: It seems that ensuring passersby are aware this casual spot serves said Japanese fare would be a smart move.)

The headliner item is the homemade ice cream (and sorbet and sherbet) section, and even for this part-time lactose avoider, it does not disappoint. Sugar Pine offers fresh house-made waffle cones and a revolving list of flavors like mango sorbet, white choco-

> late Thai tea, taro root. watermelon Thai basil, and miso caramel, plus a refreshing sans-Fruity Pebbles toppings bar with toasted coconut, chocolate chips, candied orange, and puffed rice.

It's highly recommended that you really double down on indulgence with an added scoop to create a craft beer float or affogato. The bakery team apparently never sleeps, churning out endless layered cakes, pretty fruit tarts, mochi (red bean FTW), and a variety of cookies. Suffice it to say, whether embarking on an afterschool treat, business bribery, or date night, if even one tooth is a sweet one, you're covered for dessert here.

At night, some tables play board games while sipping bevs; some dash in and out with a cone; and others really embrace the slow food, chew-every-bite-27-times ethos. Regardless, it's no secret Austin has a major penchant for Japanese food, and Sugar Pine is upping our collective game in a majorly sweet-cute way. Wouldn't it be wonderful to see handheld rice savories evolve into a walk-down-the-street on-the-go food like our city's beloved taco?



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Farm Careers Are Sprouting in Central Texas

Three sets of first-generation farmers share their paths to getting rooted

While Silicon Hills is booming, another career path has gained traction: A number of young professionals in Central Texas have left their corporate careers, seeking work with more integrity and purpose. And now they've found their calling as farmers and land stewards, using multiple skill sets to produce responsibly grown food products and to help educate the community on why it matters.

Catherine and Tanner Klemcke entered the corporate world after college; Tanner worked in the oil industry, and Catherine worked in pharmaceutical sales. It was when they watched Food, Inc. - a documentary revealing the truth about factory farming in the U.S. - that their lives, and eventually their careers, changed drastically. Tanner said, "We started educating ourselves on how meat is raised in America. We were shocked. We started researching all the regulations and realized it was all true."

They bought an abandoned farmhouse near Victoria to create a country lifestyle and decided to try raising their own meat. Catherine said, "We didn't want to stop eating meat, we just wanted to be more conscious of how we were eating meat." And then they realized, "If we're going to do it for ourselves, we may as well do it for the community and have more of an impact. We can use our land to make a change - for the environment, for our health, and for the animals' health."

Three years ago, they brought home a cow, two pigs, and 50 chickens, but without an agricultural background, their farm in Meyersville (about two hours south of Austin) started as an experiment. Tanner said, "We put them in a pasture, fed them the right stuff, and decided to see how the meat would turn out."

The outcome was so impressive that this year they've raised 22 cows, 36 pigs, and 1,700 chickens. Their full-time collaboration, 1915 Farm, is now shipping dry-aged grass-fed beef, pasture-raised chicken, and pastured heritage pork nationwide. They offer a Grassroots Club, with bundles delivered to doorsteps and catered to the subscriber's cooking style. The "Classics" bundle features about 15 pounds of various

cuts of meat ideal for simple weeknight-style meals, like chicken breasts, various sausages, and country-style ribs; the "For the Foodie" option features slightly more elevated cuts like osso bucco and flat iron steak.

"It's just so rewarding to see how happy the animals are and how they get to thrive in their natural environment. There's such a strong correlation with the quality of the meat and how it's raised," said Tanner. "I would like to think it's made us more compassionate people, really having the chance to understand the value of an animal's life."

"There's something amazing about making your business purpose-driven rather than profit-driven," added Catherine. "We've worked more hours than we ever have before but it's just so much more rewarding so it doesn't feel like work."

GOING ALL IN

Another local couple who decided to start from scratch and try their hands at the agricultural sector, Sam and Carolynn Moffett worked for over a decade in digital advertising where they met, before acquiring Shirttail Creek Farm in Brenham (east of Austin, about halfway to Houston). "We had

been talking for years about wanting to leave all that to start a farm. We wanted to do it while the kids were still young," said Sam. "We went to Callahan's just to show the kids the goats and chickens, and we realized we were ready to go all-in."

Within a few weeks of their revelation, they found the 150-year-old farm and moved into

the original house on the property. "All of our family and friends thought we were totally out of our minds," said Sam.

The Moffetts enrolled in extension courses at Texas A&M, taking classes as specific as egg grading, and have found a network of support with other farmers. Sam said, "We have a great dialogue with other farms about what each is doing. Everyone wants to see everybody succeed."

Sam admits they've been working nonstop since starting two and a half years ago, but luckily it's due to overwhelming demand for their eggs, made from healthy free-roaming hens who graze under the sun on bugs, seeds, and forage crops planted around the property, "We started selling last October. We now have about 3,000 hens on the pasture, and we're processing about 300 meat birds per month." The eggs are distributed to local restaurants and groceries including Thom's Market, Wheatsville Co-op, and Farmhouse Delivery. Shirttail Creek Farm also sells grass-fed beef and pastured chicken, available for pickup at the farmers' market.

Despite the physically demanding lifestyle, Sam says they are happy and fulfilled: "The most stark difference is that we're waking up every day and actually doing something we're really passionate about. We didn't have that before. Living where we're living, being connected to the earth, and doing something that's tangible and rewarding like it is has been really good for our mental well-being."

Katherine Tanner also spent a decade working and living in urban environments before finding her way into farming. For years, the native Texan worked as an executive recruiter in Seattle, spending long hours on the 30th floor of a high-rise building. "It was super fast-paced and cutthroat. You had to be early, stay late, be in a cubicle, and make as many calls as you could. I missed home, and it became pretty obvious to me that it was time to get back to Texas."

She returned to her hometown of Fredericksburg and discovered Oma and Opa's Farm while exploring sustainable

> agriculture in the Hill Country. She began working for the family, utilizing all of the skills she'd honed - including German language, which is still spoken on the farm. "I came to the table with sales, photography, and social media skills. Immediately I came on doing the farmers' markets - designing new

tablecloths and new ways of displaying things. My favorite thing is considering how we present to the people."

Katherine had stepped up in her role there when Marion and J.W. Ottmers were ready to hand over ownership of the 49-yearold farm to the next generation. In May, Bradley Ottmers and Katherine Tanner became co-owners of their rebranded Hat & Heart Farm. The farm sells seasonal produce, chicken eggs, goat and turkey meat, and they've worked with numerous restaurants including Barley Swine, East Side Pies, Dai Due Taqueria, Emmer & Rye, Jack Allen's Kitchen, LeRoy & Lewis Barbecue, Odd Duck, Olamaie, Suerte, and Vino Vino.

"I'm out there planting, picking, weeding, washing, packing, hauling. I feel like I'm learning a bachelor's degree amount of knowledge every month. I'm learning about goat health and how to herd as I interact with livestock. I'm learning all about solar and rainwater-catching systems. I read legislation that's been passed lately. There's

also HR, accounting, and going to the bank." Katherine said.

She acknowledges the physical strain of the role, but explains that it's highly fulfilling coming back to her roots to create something good. "I always wanted to do something of meaning that added to the world and didn't subtract from it. I am uplifted every day even though I'm working harder than I have in my entire life. I feel closer to my community because I know who grew or raised almost everything we eat. There's so

much more connection to the earth, to the people, and to the community."

The owners of Shirttail Creek Farm and Hat & Heart Farm can be found at various Austin farmers' markets, and the 1915 Farm animals (and their humans) have a very active social media presence. 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I can still remember the first time I saw her. It was around 2005, and my (now) husband was introducing me to a genre of film called giallo. He put on All the Colors of the Dark, Sergio Martino's 1972 story of a woman who has terrible nightmares in which she's chased by a knife-wielding killer. Her husband thinks she's crazy, and her new neighbor thinks she just needs to participate in a little devil worship. I absolutely loved the movie, and there was a point when I actually turned to my husband and said. "She is the most beautiful woman I've ever seen." This was the beginning of my love affair - OK, my obsession - with Italian actress Edwige Fenech. Some 15 years later, it's still going strong.

I'm not the only one with a Fenech obsession: Both Quentin Tarantino and Eli Roth worship her as well.

Roth cast her as the art teacher in Hostel: Part II, and Tarantino paid homage to her with the character Commander Ed Fenech (played by Mike Myers) in Inglourious Basterds.

Just who is Edwige Fenech? I get that question every once in a while on Twitter, especially with new followers, because I nearly always use a photo of her as my avatar and I tend to post a lot of pictures and GIFs of her. On any given Friday, I might post a thread of Fenech images with the hashtag #FenechFriday. She is totally "my brand," as the kids like to say. When I get that question, I tell people that if there was a Queen of Giallo, Fenech would definitely wear the crown.

For the uninitiated, the British Film Institute (BFI) defines giallo as "most often characterised as an Italian crime film with murder-mystery elements. ... A tradition that gleefully mixes high and low culture, where you'll find flashes of artistic brilliance sharing the screen with moments of jaw-dropping squalor." Fenech has worked with some of the most famous filmmakers in the genre, like Mario Bava (Five Dolls for an

August Moon), Giuliano Carnimeo (The Case of the Bloody Iris), and, more importantly, her brother-in-law Sergio Martino.

Along with Fenech's husband and Sergio's brother Luciano (who produced their movies), the pair worked on almost a dozen films together over the span of three decades. Some of her best work - and the best gialli, period - is with Martino: The Strange Vice of Mrs. Wardh (1971) and Your Vice Is a Locked Room and Only I Have the Key (1972), as well as my favorite of her performances, the aforementioned All the Colors of the Dark. While most of Fenech's characters in these films are similar (a tormented woman trying to not to be offed by a black-gloved killer), she always brings something a little different to each of these roles. They have an innocence about them in even the most lurid of the gialli.

What is it about Edwige Fenech that I like so much? It's hard to put it into words. She's dazzling to watch. You just can't take your eyes off her. She commands


attention when she's onscreen. Honestly, she really is one of the most beautiful people ever filmed.

Some people love Marilyn Monroe; others love Elizabeth Taylor. While Fenech might not be a household name, she is my favorite actress. Later in her career, she made a lot of commedia sexy all'italiana (Italian sex comedies), which I don't particularly care for, but she's still amazing in them. I believe her stunning good looks worked against her and she was limited in the roles she was offered. However, her work in the giallo films of the 1970s is iconic. It's hard to think about those movies without also thinking about her. She is a legend and will always hold a special place in my heart.

The Man With the Horn

A legend of jazz in Miles Davis: Birth of the Cool

D: Stanley Nelson. (NR, 115 min.)

The legacy in American popular culture of the great jazzman Miles Davis looms almost as large as his contribution to music. Stanley Nelson's documentary aims to examine that cultural legacy. The birth of cool is more than a Miles Davis album title, so this movie tells the story of the man with the horn (another album title) and how Davis became an American pop icon, It's how the trumpeter with the raspy voice, who performed with a sunk-

en-cheeked glare and his back to the audience, was embraced as a prickly but beloved cultural figure despite his substantial problems with the abuse of anesthetizing substances as well as the physical abuse of the MILES DAVIS: women he loved.

Using archival photos and filmed footage, along with personal accounts from many of those who knew him, Nelson creates a portrait of the man and

his times. The actor Carl Lumbly also contributes firsthand voiceover commentary taken directly from the musician's memoir Miles: The Autobiography, delivered in the musician's signature rasp. Davis' life story takes him from a childhood in Illinois where the livelihood of his father, a dental surgeon, made the Davis family the second-richest black family in the state to his young manhood in New York where the sounds emanating from

the 52nd Street jazz clubs beckoned. The film follows his musical progression though bebop to cool jazz to fusion and rock arenas, as well as his contributions to the worlds of painting, movies, and fashion. It also charts a path through the effects on the artist of American racism in the latter part of the 20th century: and although the film never shies away from Davis' vicissitudes, the musician's demons of heroin, booze, and domestic abuse remain

> more in the background than the forefront of this overall picture.

Were you to know nothing about Miles Davis, Nelson's film would provide a good primer. Testimonies

> from such colleagues as Herbie Hancock, Archie Schepp, Quincy Jones, and wife Frances Taylor offer illuminating insights. Nelson's craftsmanship in constructing the movie's montages of certain places and moments

are expert and, at this point, Nelson has become a singularly adept documentarian of the American black experience. Nelson has gifted us with a thoughtful and rich profile which, like a fading note escaping from Davis' trumpet, leaves us wanting more.

D: Max Lewkowicz. (PG-13, 92 min.)

One of the most beloved musicals of the last century gets its origin story in the doc Fiddler: A Miracle of Miracles, chronicling the history of 1964's Fiddler on the Roof. Lewkowicz (Underfire: The Untold Story of Pfc. Tony Vaccaro) examines not only the history of this text, but seeks to place it in the context of the post-Holocaust Jewish experience and the social and civil revolutions of the Sixties. The film is a heady brew of analysis and connections, mostly through myriad talking heads of scholars and actors, and of course, the principal architects (the ones still alive, of course). This is coupled with scenes of various productions of the musical, from Broadway and high school revivals to international productions in Japan. The point consistently worked on here is how the universal themes of the musical transcend any kind of specific ethnic experience. It's tradition versus modernity, it's defiance in the face of oppression, but more importantly, the film speaks to how Fiddler on the Roof resonates time and time again, across generations, to the human condition.

Based on stories written by Russian author Sholem Aleichem (first collected in 1894 as Tevye and His Daughters, the creators of the musical (Jerry Bock, Sheldon Harnick, and Joseph Stein) brought to life Tevye (Zero Mostel on stage, Chaim Topol in the film adaptation). He's an everyman. a dairy farmer who talks to God, has five teenage daughters, loves his wife, and has a penchant for ruminations on the nature of existence. The doc brings together some

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heavy hitters (Joel Grey, Lin-Manuel Miranda, Stephen Sondheim are just a few) rounded out by various scholars and scions of the original participants. Lewkowicz's film also adds further context in its forays into forced marriage (and how a number of young Jewish women ended up in Buenos Aires as prostitutes) and the Jewish diaspora from Imperial Russia. Then there's Jerome Robbins, who came on as the dance choreographer for the production. A complicated and difficult genius (as if there were any other kind), he once testified before the House Committee on Un-American Activities and the implications are that his sexual identity was in jeopardy. That caused strife with both creators and actors, and is one of the more fascinating elements in a doc that is jam-packed with them.

If you read the words "If I Were a Rich Man" or "Matchmaker, Matchmaker" and start humming the melodies, chances are this film will be a treasure trove of insight into not just the making of a musical, but of women and men who had the courage of their convictions in the face of odds set against them.

LINDA RONSTADT: THE SOUND OF MY VOICE D: Jeffrey Friedman, Rob Epstein. (PG-13, 95 min.)

"When Will I Be Loved?" belts Linda Ronstadt, the singer whose remarkable, decades-long career is recounted in this movie. The answer to that musical query lies here in this loving and valorizing survey of the life of this extraordinary song stylist. Love is ladled out in heaping spoonfuls through well-crafted montages and testimonies from fellow artists. The content is enjoyable and informative, a loving tribute even if deeper analysis and insight rarely rear their heads. Yet I dare anyone not to snap to attention and spontaneously follow the sound of that voice.

There are so many aspects of Ronstadt's music career to delve into: the clarion voice that burst through our transistor radios in the fall of 1967 on the song "Different Drum" (that voice and that song with its transposed gender references made an indelible, lifetime impact on this reviewer when it was first heard on her bedroom radio at the age of

15); the solo and backup singer on countless folk rock, pop, and arena rock anthems; a Broadway soprano in *The Pirates of Penzance*: the singer of Mexican canciones on records that had the most American sales of any Spanish-language music: and a collaborator and harmonist with such other independent female artists as Dolly Parton, Emmylou Harris, Bonnie Raitt, and others. This documentary touches on them all, while various speakers sing her praises. Ronstadt also fills in parts of her story in a voiceover that offhandedly mentions the Parkinson's disease that ended her singing career a decade ago. Yet only in a sweet, perfectly captured moment in her living room - a moment that provides the film's ending - does the illness come into play, leaving the irony to the audience to tease out about the voice that studio executives could never harness being felled by the foibles of her own body.

Filmmakers Friedman and Epstein prove surprisingly lax in terms of seeing Ronstadt's career through a cultural lens. Since they are a top-notch documentary duo with such probing films as The Celluloid Closet and The Times of Harvey Milk representative of their filmography, it's fair to have expected more from this music doc. References are made to Ronstadt's massive insecurities as well as her bold and self-directed accomplishments, but the things that tether these seemingly contradictory poles are left unexplored or only briefly touched upon. There's a rich undertow to be sorted through about a woman's ambitions in the male-dominated world of the music business, a woman who had many romances that provided fodder for gossip columns vet never married and adopted children on her own, and how a song stylist who can claim a tune and make

it her own is a musical artist in her own right. Only in a couple of instances do the filmmakers include temporal references onscreen. leaving the rest of Ronstadt's timeline in a bit of confusion, especially when employing signature songs in time periods prior to their recording. The benefit, however, is that we are treated to a voluminous amount of Ronstadt's singing and a revealing look at her early family life. "Don't get me wrong, it's not that I knock it," but Linda Ronstadt: The Sound of Mv Voice could stand a remix.

RAPID RESPONSE

D: Roger Hinze, Michael William Miles. (PG-13, 99 min.)

"We really prayed each day that nothing bad would happen." If there was a mantra for the early days of medical professionals on racetracks, then those words from motorsports medical expert Stephen Olvey would be it. While crashes are (let's face it) cool to watch, you always want the driver to walk away. Yet through to the 1980s, race car drivers knew that dying during a race - impaled, shattered. immolated - wasn't just a possibility, but part and parcel of getting in the cockpit.

Rapid Response looks at the often overlooked lifesavers of the racetrack through the experiences of Olvey, a pioneer in crash medicine and – ultimately – design. Well, mostly overlooked. While casual fans of racing may know the big-name drivers, the hardened ones know the doctors: For decades in Formula One, the most consistently recognizable name after sport supremo Bernie Ecclestone was racetrack doctor Sid Watkins so much so that if you said "F1" and "Sid" in the same sentence, everyone knew who you meant. Rapid Response walks through the history of the fight to make trackside first response more than two guys with a stretcher and a bucket of sand.

Rapid Response is a celebration of behindthe-scenes heroes, and their dedication to medicine and science as a way to save lives. Its microfocus, anecdotal structure. and reliance on archive footage and talking heads, undoubtedly makes this one for the true devotees of motorsports, but they'll not want to miss it. The epic and sometimes stomach-churning footage of crashes is rarely graphic, as co-directors Hinze and Miles steer clear of gruesome footage in favor of letting the long shot footage and the medical professionals speak to the carnage. However, it's undoubtedly moving, as Olvey and his medical peers like orthopedic expert Terry Trammell – and the drivers who they helped save - talk about seeing friends die or be permanently mutilated. Yet it's also a story of quiet heroism, as Olvey and others go from EMTs to safety advocates. They're researchers, interested in finding ways to make the inevitable accidents. Once they

had convinced the sport that it needed experienced and dedicated medics, it's all about saving lives. Worried about burns? Get the fuel and fuel tanks changed. Drivers passing out from G-forces? Tell the track owners to redesign corners. And, of course, overcoming the hubristic macho personalities of race car drivers who had to learn that dying on the track wasn't an acceptable workplace risk.

RIOT GIRLS


Part postapocalyptic John Hughes jocks versus The Outsiders and part queer-friendly actioner that pulls zero punches when it comes to gray class warfare, this debut feature from the former editor of Canadian genre mag Rue Morgue is a stylish and viscerally heartfelt ode to teen rebels, misfits, and LGBTO outsiders everywhere. The fact that it's set in 1995 after a mysterious plague wipes out all the adults makes it an even more dystopian take on teen anarchy than Lord of the Flies - albeit with varsity-jacket-clad, musclebound meatheads. They're dubbed the "Titans" (their former high school mascot, one assumes) attempting to impose a jock patriarchy via psychotic "pep rallies"

that double as public executions for those that don't follow the orders of leader Jeremy (a charismatic Chambers) to the letter.

With its all-female direction, editing, cinematography, and a tight little script by Katherine Collins. Riot Girls literally takes many of its cues from the mid-Nineties riot grrrl scene birthed in Portland and Seattle. Opposing the Titans' bloodthirsty attempts to take over the unnamed and unparented town's social order are mohawked punk badass Scratch (an amazing turn from Kwiatkowski) and her prom-queen teen dream best friend Nat (Iseman), who ultimately prove to be every bit as canny and, when necessary, vicious in their retaliatory strikes against the privileged, hypermasculine Titans. A sweet subplot involving their beloved puppy adds a note of tenderness to what's actually a surprisingly violent film about rival teenage gangs trapped in a world they never made. And, of course, an early scene evoking Chekhov's ever-portentous firearm foreshadows emo bloodshed to come.

Riot Girls doesn't disappoint in the mayhem department, and as a meta-story about female empowerment in an increasingly threatening "men's world," this wild and woolly take on teen-angsters past would make Furiosa herself cheer. Not everything clicks, in particular some wooden dialogue, but Vuckovic's fable has

TOKYO GHOUL: 'S'

D: Kentaro Hagiwara: with Masataka Kubota. Shota Matsuda. Maika Yamamoto, Shun'ya Shiraishi. (NR, 107 min., subtitled)

The first live-action film of Sui Ishida's long-running and gory manga Tokyo Ghoul came out in 2017, and the bloody sequel opens up with little guarter for newcomers. This world is immediately shown as a hideous and warped place, where cannibalistic ghouls prey on humans - the only sustenance that can support them. Ken Kaneki (Kubota) has recently become one of the wolves preying on the flock, a half-ghoul created by surgery, and he's trying to get used to his new inhuman status - including his kagune, an organ that all ghouls have that produces some kind of bladed extrusion from their body. Fellow ghoul Touka Kirishima (Yamamoto) is trying to train him in his new abilities, as well as making it clear that he's no longer human, and that people are meat.

However, not all predators are created equal, and there are those hunters that hunt the hunters. Shu Tsukiyama (Matsuda) is the Epicure, a cosmopolitan ghoul with a refined palate who seeks only the finest delicacies (the ingredients for his favorite breakfast meat make blood sausage seem like celery sticks). He's set to break the golden rule that ghouls don't eat ghouls, and the half-and-half Kaneki is just too delicious and rare a treat to leave untasted.

Tokyo Ghoul falls into the grand tradition of heroes embracing their monstrous nature, but the real dynamic is that Ken is an awkward nerd failing to cut it with the cool kid ghouls. That the coolest of the emo kid ne plus ultra takes an interest in him gets an added homoerotic subtext every time Tsukiyama - Mads Mikkelsen's Hannibal with even floppier hair - wistfully plays the piano and moans about eating him.

Initially, that could be written off as inadvertent, since manga has a long tradition of effete villains. But when the painfully naive Ken is invited to an underground ghoul restaurant that seems to owe more to the

orgy sequence from Eves Wide Shut than MasterChef, any understatement disappears into high camp. Especially as that's when the monster-hunting Commission of Counter Ghoul turns up, armed with guingue (bladed weapons derived from the kagune) that just look like giant CGI Final Fantasy swords.

Tokyo Ghoul: 'S' is at its best when it embraces its high weirdness (Shu setting up a cannibalistic threesome is hilarious) but it's never sure what it wants to be. Its CGIenhanced fight sequences are too fleeting to be anything other than a snack, while characters and subplots are teased but then forgotten (fans of Ken's overly chirpy friend Hide will be especially disappointed). The bigger problem is the lack of focus. The first film was shredded for being too gruesome (a strange criticism for a horror adaptation), and while 'S' never shies away from its own stomach-churning visuals, Ken is too milquetoast and Shu too histrionic for their dinner date to ever leave you satisfied.

The Whitbread Round the World Race (now the Volvo Ocean Race) is the world's largest and most famous around-the-word regatta. It's a costly and cutthroat hypermasculine test of speed, endurance, and more than a little lunacy. Director Holmes focuses his watertight lens and employs a wealth of archival footage to recount how never-sav-die Aussie vacht skipper Tracy Edwards, "a young slip of a girl" with a troubled backstory and severe wanderlust, fell in love with seafaring and eventually ended up putting a 12-member, all-female crew on board a barely seaworthy vessel to compete in the 1989-90 Whitbread. Win, lose, or draw, Edwards and the crew of the Maiden unquestionably shattered the glass hull of this most dangerous and often outright deadly waterborne challenge, and Holmes' documentary is as inspirational and empowering as it is exhilarating. Conventionally animated but paced with kinetic glee, Ne Zha crams in a plethora of contemporary and pop culture references that distract from where it's most fun and most endearing, with the demon-child's loyal parents trying to work out how to keep him from darkness and eventual electrocution, leading to some sweet child-friendly message about fate and friendship. The pair saunter through L.A. in full-on leisure mode, encountering various famous names, among them newly arrived next-door neighbors Sharon Tate (Robbie) and her sparsely glimpsed husband Roman Polanski (Zawierucha), Green Hornet star Bruce Lee (Moh), and those creepy hippies hanging out at the Spahn Ranch. Here to Do the Devil's Work

ROB ZOMBIE RESURRECTS THE FIREFLY FAMILY FOR 3 FROM HELL by Richard Whittaker

Filmmaker **Rob Zombie** first introduced the world to the murderous, cannibalistic. necrophiliac Firefly family in 2003's psychotronic trip House of 1000 Corpses. Wildly divisive at the time, its loval fans kept the clan rolling into what is widely regarded as Zombie's masterpiece, 2005's dusty road trip nightmare The Devil's Rejects.

And that was where the story seemed to stop. After all, the denouement was the last remaining members of the kith and kin killers - devious clown Captain Spaulding (grindhouse icon Sid Haig), cheerleader from hell Baby (Sheri Moon Zombie), and the merciless Otis (The Texas Chainsaw Massacre 2's **Bill Moseley**) – getting gunned down by the law in a Bonnie & Clyde-style ambush. Dead, finito, pushing up daisies, right? That was what Zombie thought, too. But 14 years later, the Fireflies are reignited in the third and (he's pretty sure) final installment in their bloody tale, 3 From Hell. But how did they escape the grave this time?

Truth is, Zombie said, they never really stayed buried. "Every day I'd see another T-shirt, action figure, Halloween costume, tattoo. So they were always in my life, constantly." After years of idle thoughts about how to potentially revive them, around three years ago, "I was like, 'I think I've got this figured out. Fuck it, I'm going to see if I can make this happen.' No one's getting any younger, everybody seems like themselves, it's now or never"

His first intent was to make a third film that felt truly different - just as he didn't want The Devil's Rejects to be House of 1000 Corpses 2. Instead, he wrote an ambitious. international three-act structure. "Any one of those scenarios could have been the whole film," he said. "'OK, we're a prison movie,' 'OK, we're a home invasion movie,' 'OK, they're only in Mexico." But by stitching them together, he said, "we make it a Part Three that's an actual Part Three, not just, 'Well, that's Part Two again.'"

Getting the crew back together wasn't that hard: In fact, the biggest resistance came from closest to the writer/director - his wife, Sheri, "She was the most skeptical," he said. "She goes, 'You know what? The last movie was great, it ended great, and we don't want to ruin it. Obviously I'll read the script and if it's something I want to do, I'll do it, but that's my thought."

It was a dinner with Moseley and Haig that sealed the deal for her, but that's not who the eponymous three are this time. Spaulding takes a back seat, and enter Winslow Foxworth Coltrane, aka Foxy, played by British character actor Richard Brake. He's the lost half-brother of the family come back into the family business, and without the *ahem* calming influence of the Captain, the children will bicker. Zombie said, "Baby's off on her own, and Otis feels like he's public enemy number one. But then you have the half brother who feels like, 'What about my rep? I'm a badass as well."

SCARY STORIES TO TELL IN THE DARK

Three misfit teens – Stella (Colletti), Auggie (Rush), and Chuck (Zajur) – discover a mysterious book: Originally the property of 19th century local legend-cum-bugaboo Sarah Bellows, the musty old tome in question turns out to be a self-writing storybook of horrors. A mixed bag of ghoulish tricks, this adaptation of author Alvin Schwartz and artist Stephen Gammell's creeptastic HarperCollins kid-lit frightmares packs a disturbing wallop but is ultimately undone by some less than remarkable character development and an unnecessary, if currently contemporaneous, pseudo-political undertones. Parents of impressionable preteens be forewarned, it's a hard PG-13, albeit one so gorgeously lit and shot that I found the freakishly inventive imagery lingering in my mind long after the house lights went up. Cheer Up Charlies Principal Maggie Lea Takes on Breast Cancer

In 2010, **Tamara Hoover** expanded her vegan food truck to a newly vacant bar space on East Sixth. The same year, recent college graduate **Maggie Lea** began coordinating outdoor screenings as **Cinema East**. The

two eventually joined forces to run **Cheer Up Charlies**, which relocated to Red River. Their artistic dedication has powered the space into one of Austin's most influential and beloved live music venues.

Without outside partners, the "ambiguous everybody space" has sustained on Hoover and Lea's dogged independence and

LGBTQ-friendly outreach. They're not attuned to asking for help, but today the life and business partners launched **GoFundMe** page "Let's Go Maggie! Beat Breast Cancer!" to raise \$8,000.

"I could've been dead at 33," admits Lea, who received a diagnosis for stage 2 breast

cancer two months ago. "I'm just glad I found this tumor."

She recently wrapped up the second of six rounds of chemotherapy and plans to have surgery in January. The diagnosis followed a

challenging year for Lea and Hoover after a considerable portion of their senior bar staff moved on to different jobs. New gen staffers are now running smoothly, and Lea still visits the venue, but the forced rest time has granted her clarity on past periods of mental health neglect.

"I was trying to figure out how to fix everything in my life, and I

felt like all the words were scrambled," says the Houston native. "When I was diagnosed, for some reason, all the words fell onto the page. Now it's legible, and I can see forward."

She tracks the work/life scramble to the venue's relocation five years ago to the patiolined space of **Club DeVille**. The new Cheer Ups eventually found a niche for fundraisers and collaborations with student groups like **KVRX**, alongside their longtime emphasis on drag and dance parties. Around that time, Lea

"Looking back now, I didn't realize I had become this totally self-sufficient, lonely island of functioning everyday robotically," shares the business owner. "I neglected to handle some of the emotional stuff that I had been putting away, and I'm still processing it."

also faced the death of her younger sister.

Today, Lea maintains most of her hair. That's no small triumph given that she was supposed to be bald by now. In fact, Hoover's jogging group, **Rogue Running**, helped fund **Chemo Cold Caps** to assist in maintaining her partner's trademark mane.

Another recent shakeup – the business' 2018 lease renewal – now presents a point of positivity. In the shadow of Downtown hotel developments, Cheer Ups is signed on for five more years. During negotiations, Lea pulled on daily inspirations at her rainbow-hued community space.

"I'll see two girls on their first date, or two older women in their 60s hanging out, or a trans person that just came out, and they'll come to the bar and talk to me," adds the co-owner. "We stay open for people like that."

formed to actively oppose the expansion
in June.

At the meeting, new nonprofit **Austin Texas Musicians** spoke in favor of the expansion, with input from local musicians **Nakia Reynoso** and **Tom Van Schaik**, drummer for **Robert Earl Keen**. Executive
Director **Patrick Buchta** conveyed that the project's ability to unlock tax funds previously not routed to local music makes it beneficial for all players.

"We're talking about the first-ever public funding for music," said Buchta.

Representing Unconventional Austin, local attorney and longtime civic activist **Fred Lewis** spoke against this ideological grouping. Diving into city tax code revisions up for Council vote on Sept. 19, he pointed out that city funds could theoretically support music under current laws.

"The money isn't coming from the hotel occupancy tax, but they're making it contingent on that," said Lewis. "That's not legal. That's not financial. That's political. They could give you the money now."

Historically, funding has never reached music. Commission member **Gavin Garcia**, who later voted in support of the Convention Center, emphasized that the group is well aware of Lewis' legal argument.

"We know that money's always been there," said Garcia. "This is just a focal point **Mayor Adler** has presented. There are a lot of people eating from this plate."

Attorney and **Music Venue Alliance Austin** founder **Rebecca Reynolds** responded directly to Lewis' statements: "To use

your status as an attorney to pander to this group is insulting, to say the least. ... The particular bucket that the money is coming from is irrelevant, because the only way we're going to get it out is if we agree to this plan that helps the broader community."

Ahead of a final vote, commission member Jonathan Mahone, aka Chaka of Riders Against the Storm, presented an earnest explanation of why he wouldn't support the project. Convention Center plans date back to a 2017 Visitor Impact Task Force, which Mahone served on. At the close of the process, he says he was excluded from penning the final recommendations, despite being the only black person in the group.

"It represents Austin in a nutshell for me, and my experience as a black musician in this city," said Mahone. "I have no faith in their points about delivering anything to underrepresented groups. People continue to talk about equity, but somehow my voice continues to be ignored when I'm present on a regular basis.

"It's sickening."

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

Daniel Johnston, the influential singer-songwriter and visual artist who painted Austin's famous "Hi, How Are You" frog mural on the Drag, died at home Tuesday night, Sept. 10, following a presumed heart attack at age 58. The news was confirmed on Wednesday by his former manager Jeff

and frequent adjustments to his medica-

tion. In January, while famous fans like the Flaming Lips and Bob Mould covered his songs at ACL Live at the Moody Theater for the second annual Hi, How Are You Day, Daniel landed in the hospital again.

Johnston, who was raised in West Virginia and moved to Austin in the early Eighties, counts 17 full-length albums of original music, including an incredible trio of home-recorded tapes from 1983: More Songs of Pain, Yip/Jump Music, and Hi, How Are You. He has at least three more LPs worth of original music that are yet to be released.

"I've been working on a new album with

Excerpt from "Playback: No Really, How Are You?," Jan. 19, 2018:

"People call it Jeremiah, like Jeremiah from the Bible, but it's not really the frog's name," clarified Daniel Johnston about the happy, tentacle-eyed amphibian famous from both his 1983 cassette Hi, How Are You: The Unfinished Album and the mural at Guadalupe & 21st Street. "I didn't have a name like that for the frog. I always called it the Innocent Frog.

"He's full of innocence the way I was back then. I remember they paid me \$70 to do it! And I was happy." Today, most know the iconic image from its overhanging phrase: "Hi, how are you,"

"When I was growing up, after church, everybody shook hands and would say, 'Hi, How are you?'" recounts Johnston. "I always heard it, even at the funeral home when there was some dead person who died of old age. The undertaker said to me, and I was just a little boy, 'Hi. How are you?' That's how that started.

"Then, when I worked at AstroWorld. I found a container in the garbage that held rubber frogs." he elaborates. "It had a picture of a frog and it said on it, 'Hi. How are you?' So I decided to name my album Hi, How Are You." - K.C.

[Austin's] Brian Beattie for years, and I hope it comes out real soon," Johnston told the Chronicle in 2018.

His songs have been covered by Tom Waits and Yo La Tengo and championed by Kurt Cobain. His ongoing trials with schizophrenia and manic depression were explored in the 2005 documentary The Devil and Daniel Johnston.

Beattie, close friends with the singer since the early Eighties, and later his producer, spoke with the Chronicle yesterday about what made Johnston so inimitable.

"When we heard those tapes, *Hi*, *How Are* You and all those, there wasn't any other music from my age group where it was so absolutely personal," he attested. "The things he was singing about, it was almost voyeuristic to hear it. So, he really cracked open the kind of emotions you don't understand yet. He was all about those emotions. He understood not

understanding them. "To me, there was something about the way he was only being himself and, at the same time, he was completely

formed by the larger world, yet he was so uniquely private in that weird way that he was."

Beattie says the first day he and his Glass Eye bandmate Kathy McCarty really hung out with Johnston, the singer brought them up to his apartment and presented a copy of The Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders.

"He opened it up and read to us 'schizophrenia' and 'manic depressive' and he said, 'If you're gonna deal with me, you're gonna need to understand these kind of symptoms because that's what I'm like."" Beattie recalls. "I thought it was so careful of him to do that."

Even when he was working at the McDonald's on the Drag, Johnston had ambitions of being a rock star. While he ultimately never attained the rock star lifestyle - or the romantic love that he sought in his songs - he did become a musical legend.

"He's legendary, but he was first a legend in his own mind, then he became a real legend," posits Beattie. "That was the only time I saw that happen where someone was like, 'I'm gonna get famous' and he just kind of made himself. He was the least likely person on Earth to get popular and he did. I'm in awe of the power of the songwriting.

"He was the first person I met who just wielded songwriting like that."

In recent years, at his friend's urging, Beattie finalized a wonderful new Daniel Johnston album titled If. Its producer campaigned for it to be released, but he hasn't gotten approval from Johnston's management. Beattie says there are at least two more albums of previously unheard DJ

material of the same quality among the recordings they did together, many of which were tracked at Johnston's family home in Waller.

In the fall of 2017, Johnston embarked on what was billed as his "final tour." although

he didn't think it would be at the time. The five-date North America run featured the songsmith performing with artists and acts he had influenced, including Wilco leader Jeff Tweedy, Built to Spill, the Preservation All-Stars, the Districts, and Modern Baseball. Early last year, Johnston appeared at the Mohawk in Austin for the inaugural Hi, How Are You Day concert, which he closed with a curtain-call rendition of his most iconic song: "True Love Will Find You in the End."

That turned out to be his last performance.

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

The seventh annual Eastside Kings Festival honors the Lone Star State's surviving blues heroes, so bassist Chuck Rainey - a man with a résumé longer than most hanging scrolls - stems his international touring schedule to perform on three consecutive nights. Born in Youngstown. Ohio. Rainev has called Texas home for 35 vears. Son to two pianists, the longtime DFW dweller grew up swarmed by an inescapable cloud of sonics.

"We had our days in the house where we'd just have music day, especially when I got around 12," recalls the multi-instrumentalist. "We all had to do something on Wednesday night, especially during the summer. Everybody had to sing, play, or do something, so I've been around music all my life."

Bass serves as the foundation of most instrumental fabrics, the hem of many rhythms.

"If I weren't a bass player, I would be a drummer because rhythm has always been the platform from which I play," affirms Rainey.

Before becoming bandleader on five albums, the smooth-talking baritone helped lay the groundwork for luminaries including Steely Dan, Ouincy Jones, Etta James, and Aretha Franklin, For Rainey, all of those expe-

riences served him well, irrespective of the encounters ending pleasantly or poorly.

"I do have favorite people that I've worked with, but none is really like number one," the 79-year-old said before mentioning Donny Hathaway and Harry Belafonte as two of his favorite collaborators. He also mentioned looking forward to performing with artists he's recorded alongside, namely Shake Anderson, whom he joins at Antone's on

Friday, and Lucky Peterson.

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
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"Home-school!"



New Texas Gun Laws

The 86th Texas Legislative session, which ended in June, passed a series of Texas gun laws, most of which are designed to provide protection for licensed gun owners to carry legal firearms in various places. The underlying theory behind most of the new laws, as stated by the politicians that helped draft and pass the legislation, is to "arm the good guys" against those that would violate the law and do harm. Here's a summary of the new gun Texas gun laws.

Weapons in Rental Properties: Landlords cannot prohibit residents from lawfully possessing, carrying, transporting, or storing firearms on the rented property (House Bill 302).

Guns in Churches, Synagogues, and Temples: Licensed handgun owners can legally carry their weapons into places of religious worship. The new law, Senate Bill 535, provided clarity on an existing law on the topic. Many in favor of this new

law cited the 2017 fatal shooting of 26 people at a Baptist church in Sutherland Springs.

Guns at Schools: School districts cannot prohibit gun owners, including school employees, from storing firearms in a school parking lot as long as the gun is in a locked vehicle (HB 1143).

Armed Marshals at School: Loosens limitations on the number of armed marshals that can carry firearms at public and private schools (HB 1387).

Hurricanes, Tornadoes, Natural Disasters, and Guns: Residents evacuating from a state or local disaster area may not be charged with a crime for carrying a legal handgun (HB 1177).

In the interim period between passage of the legislation and the new laws taking effect on September 1, two more mass shootings have taken lives in Texas: the El Paso shooting, and the more recent shooting in Midland and Odessa
