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



CONSIDER AN ALTERNATE ROUTE


Dear Editor.

I would like to suggest an alternative to the proposed routing of the Blue Line ["Get On Board." News, Jan. 17] – a routing which voters rejected in 2014. Instead of crossing Lady Bird Lake, the Blue Line should run west from the airport, cross Congress Avenue, and then run south along Lamar.

This route has several advantages: 1) It saves the cost of a bridge across the lake. (They don't come cheap.) 2) It would attract many voters (and riders) living along South Lamar. (The current proposal running east of the UT campus would attract few additional voters since it is so close to the Orange Line.) 3) It would provide a simple connection to the Orange Line. (With the current proposal, someone coming from the Domain would require three separate trips to get to the airport. It would also save the cost of the planned interconnection between the two lines.) 4) Park-and-ride buses coming from South MoPac, U.S. 290, and 71 could drop commuters off at the southwest terminus of the Blue Line, thus avoiding Downtown congestion. Those wishing to reach Highland could get there with a short ride from Crestview Station using the existing Red Line rail service.

BIKE LANES ARE FOR BIKES The city
Transportation Department announced it will step
up enforcement of prohibited parking in bikeonly lanes by issuing more tickets and towing more
vehicles. A call to 311 can summon traffic police.

GAS-FREE TRANSIT cap Metro unveiled its first two electric buses Wednesday, Jan. 22, to go into regular service across multiple routes starting Sunday, Jan. 26. Over the next five years, Cap Metro intends to purchase 80 electric buses.

BEWARE THE RED PAINT The local transit agency also announced more **red bus-only lanes**. Over the next two months, transit-oriented lanes on **Guadalupe** between Third and 17th, and on **Lavaca** between Third and 15th will be painted red to signal to drivers they are not allowed in them unless they're turning right at an intersection.

LGBTQ EQUALITY AT WORK on Tuesday the Human Rights Campaign released its 2020 Corporate Equality Index assessing the LGBTQ-inclusiveness of major companies. Of the 84 Texas-based companies ranked, a mere 28 earned 100 points, with 68% being the overall average score. Notably, Indeed was the only Austin-based company to receive a top score.

SPEAKING OF LGBTQ RIGHTS Utah has become the 19th state to **ban conversion therapy** – the discredited practice seeking to change a young queer person's sexual orientation or gender identity. Meanwhile, the **Texas Legislature** has yet to send a conversion therapy ban out of committee, and local cops send family members to the unethical therapy....

IEST ME NOT Judicial and prosecutorial candidates taking part in Tuesday night's **Austin Criminal Defense Lawyers Association** forum at Alamo S. Lamar differed on much, but were united in supporting **not prosecuting personal-use marijuana possession** (the current policy) and on not testing for **THC** or **K2**. Consensus opinion: "The current testing methods are unreliable."

ANTI-CHOICE PAYOUT The Trump administration will reestablish federal funds Texas lost when it booted Planned Parenthood out of the federal-state Women's Health Program in 2012 during its continued battle against the health care provider and, more broadly, abortion rights. Trump's response reaffirms the state's dangerous behavior by saying it's just fine to block abortion providers supporting low-income women.



Department of Unintended Consequences

COULD THE NEW CODE ACTUALLY MAKE AUSTIN LESS AFFORDABLE?

In the ongoing debate about Austin's Land Development Code rewrite, there's usually a point when someone says, "Well, we can't wait any longer – we've got to do

something." Unfortunately, this ignores the very real possibility that – in its haste to put this whole mess behind them – City Council could actually make things *worse*, especially when it comes to affordability.

Pretty much everything about the new code will be a boon to landowners, developers, and wealthier residents. But the cur-

rent draft stands to leave lower income residents, especially renters, more screwed than they already are. Given that Austin is now

ranked second in the entire country for the number of new multifamily housing permits being issued (per a recent report by RealPage, a global provider of software and data analyt-

> ics for the real estate industry), there's clearly enough breathing room to get this rewrite right. So let's review some basic facts:

• You can't build your way to affordability in a hot market. Supply/demand theory only works if demand is fixed – not the case in today's Austin where more newcomers arrive every day. Moreover, for-profit

• Density doesn't equal affordability. Areas of Austin that have already seen big increases in density have also seen big increases in rents. Moreover, consultants have been unable to point to a single growing city in the U.S. where the kind of upzon-

ings proposed by the new code have actual-

ly resulted in greater affordability.

• Upzonings will increase sales prices and rents. Financial analysts and real estate professionals estimate that the proposed increases in entitlements in the new RM1 zoning, for example, will cause valuations in central neighborhoods to increase by 50%-70% for the land alone, meaning sales prices and rents will follow. In theory, homeowners could add an CONTINUED ON P.10

every day. Moreover, for-profit developers are – hello! – profit-driven. If rents or purchase prices start to flatten, they'll simply stop building.

income-producing second unit if they had \$150,000-250,000 on hand, could wait years to recoup their investment, and didn't mind losing a chunk of their homestead exemption for the portion of their property that now contains a rental unit. In practice, they'd likely be better off selling to a developer and moving to Pflugerville or beyond. Renters, of course, will be displaced without any such payout.

• New entitlements will incentivize demolitions of existing market-affordable housing (and small retail spaces, as well). Paradoxically, the proposed new entitlements risk destroying much of the market-

affordable "missing middle" housing that already exists in the same areas targeted for upzonings under the new map. These include garage apartments,

duplexes, and complexes under five units - all too small to have been counted in the city's effort to retain market-affordable rentals, which only looked at complexes of five units or more. According to real estate number crunchers, a new 1,000-square-foot missing middle unit in these same areas will cost roughly \$3,000 a month - only "affordable" if you're a family of three making \$120,000 a year.

- · Financial impacts will hit longtime residents and renters in older neighborhoods the hardest. The financial impacts of proposed upzonings will be felt most acutely by those living on or near corridors, which are concentrated in Austin's older central and central east neighborhoods. Until the last tech boom, these were not generally wealthy areas. and many longtime residents already struggle with rising property taxes or rent. As is often noted, homeowners always have the option to sell, though it means an agonizing decision to leave behind friends, family, and a community they helped build. Again, the many renters in these areas will have no such recourse.
- Upzonings favor corporate and absentee investors. The increases in land valuations, property taxes, and rent will shift development opportunities from homeowners and small local developers to large corporate investors (few prospective homeowners are in a position to outbid your average oligarch). As more land is sold to speculators, more

wealth leaves our community, leaving fewer residents with the chance to build equity through homeownership. As Planning Commissioner Carmen Llanes-Pulido recently noted, tools do exist to capture some of this transfer of wealth for local benefit, such as California's tax on outside investors, but City Council would need to build in reasonable time - say, six months - to explore these options and apply them before the rezonings.

Finally, even if we set aside affordability issues and focus only on increasing the number of housing units, the draft map disproportionately concentrates these in central and central east neighborhoods, utterly failing to meet Imagine

> Austin's goal of creating complete communities throughout the city. Nor does it achieve the current Council's directive to prioritize "all types of housing for all kinds of people in all parts of

town." Instead, it simply seeks to increase the number of people and vehicles pouring into existing bottlenecks, and ignores the fact that many major employers - such as the huge new Apple campus - are located well outside the urban core.

Arguably, the real root of Austin's housing woes is the state's heinously regressive tax structure, an issue beyond city control and one with no fix in sight. Still, Council could take some actions to ensure that the new code at least doesn't make things worse for those already struggling. These might include establishing an emergency task force to determine economic and tax impacts of proposed rezonings before enacting the new code; exploring ways to capture outside investment for local benefit; tying strong affordability requirements to any increase in entitlements over current zoning; and allowing time to better plan transition areas to ensure we keep all existing market-affordable units - especially the existing missing middle - and not just the big complexes. Finally, and most important, we need to map an equitable amount of new housing capacity throughout the city, including the so-called high-opportunity areas in the west and northwest Council districts.

It's true we've got to do something, if only to put this shit show to rest. But let's take the time to make sure we're actually making things better, not worse.

SUPPLEMENTAL STAFF REPORT 3

This all becomes relevant this week as City Council starts to get a look at parts of the newest draft of the LDC rewrite, the one they'll consider and presumably vote on upon second reading in a couple more weeks. That's precious little time for anyone to consider what is intended to be the last major round of revisions before a final draft is prepared for Council's approval as soon as late March. At their work session this week, Council got a staff briefing on that schedule and spent about 10 minutes talking about how they're going to manage their time. Here are some highlights:

- Supplemental Staff Report 3 will "be out in the next couple weeks so you all can see the response to all those amendments" that Council directed at first reading in December.
- Staff is still "working toward completing the new map," but is scheduling Council members "to come look at a preview of that map" in 45-minute blocks this Friday, Jan. 24.
- Staff will present an overview of the supplemental report to the Council's Housing and Planning Committee this coming Tuesday, Jan. 28, 10am-noon.
- At two special called Council work sessions Feb. 4-5, staff will present deep dives on the Affordable Housing Bonus Program, Housing Capacity, and "the new map, which is going to look significantly different after the amendments you made at first reading" (Tuesday, 1pm); and zone modeling/rendering, the Preservation Incentive, and changes to floor/area ratio. impervious cover, and other non-zoning regs (Wednesday, 9am).
- Second-reading votes are tentatively scheduled for Tue.-Thu., Feb. 11-13, though there was some waffling about times and discussion on how to work around preexisting meetings.

Retaliation Against Those Participating in APD Investigation?

Last week, advocates with the **Austin Justice Coalition** held a press conference to announce that multiple officers have faced retaliation for speaking out against racism within the **Austin Police Department** after City Manager **Spencer Cronk** hired a third-party investigator to look into explosive allegations of racist behavior by some of APD's highest-ranking leaders.

AJC's **Chas Moore** said he knows the names of the officers involved but couldn't disclose them for fear of putting their jobs at risk. He did say that it was more than two people and includes officers of color or those belonging to the LGBTQ community. The behavior described by Moore included both official department reprimands and peer-to-peer interactions – in some cases, the officers of color have been accused of racism themselves.

Moore implored the city to do all it could to protect those speaking out against bigotry within the department, saying doing so was critical to the integrity of the ongoing third-party investigation, conducted by former Bexar County prosecutor **Lisa Tatum**, as well as future Council-initiated investigations set to begin after Tatum's work concludes. "We want to make sure that they're protected," Moore said. "We want to make sure that the investigations are not tampered with by people being retaliated against."

Council Member **Natasha Harper-Madison** joined Moore to urge people to continue participating in any internal investigative work, and shared concern that alleged retaliation could discourage people from speaking out against bigotry within the force. In an email sent to Council later that night, Cronk acknowledged he knew the AJC's revelation of these allegations was coming, and he took the opportunity to reiterate his commitment to finding out the truth "in a fair and transparent manner. ... It is my expectation that people can speak out about any issue within our city government, and can do so without fear of retaliation."

Tatum's work began in November after formal complaints alleged that recently retired Assistant Chief Justin Newsom regularly used the N-word, that Chief of Staff **Troy Gay** encouraged a family member to participate in "conversion therapy," and that Chief **Brian Manley** supported Gay's efforts and waited to act on the allegations against Newsom. The third-party investigation is expected to conclude in February, according to Cronk's email.

Trudy's Files for Bankruptcy

Following growing discontent over late payments to employees and increasingly obvious signs of a business in disarray, an attorney for local Tex-Mex staple **Trudy's** filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy on Wednesday afternoon. **Stephen Sather** of Barron & Newburger, P.C., tells the *Chronicle* that the total sum of the debt surrounding the filing is around \$4 million.

"The goal is to get the business stabilized, pay the employees and win back the goodwill of the customers." Sather wrote in an email.

The documents pin Trudy's financial woes on its enormous **Trudy's Four Star** in Hays County (2011-19), which lost approximately \$1 million annually. The losses contributed to Trudy's Texas Star Inc. owing money to the state for taxes, along with employees, banks, suppliers, its health insurance provider, and the IRS, which froze the company's credit card receipts.

The filings also note that company founder **Gary Truesdell** has stepped aside due to health concerns, and his son **Stephen** is now overseeing the reorganization, which includes two currently operating restaurants and the original campus-area location that's been out of order since an interior fire in November 2019.

Last week, the *Chronicle* reported that employees had been enduring late payments, bounced checks, and oddly timed cash payouts since last November, in addition to a chaotic work environment that included a bar and kitchen low on key inventory, such as draft beer ("Trudy's Employees Revolting Over Late Pay," Jan. 16). One of the bankruptcy filings, a motion to pay pre-petition wages, states that the company is currently delinquent \$13,000 from the payroll for Jan. 1 and \$237.161 from the pay date of Jan. 15. — *Kevin Curtin*





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City Council returns from a holiday break for their first regular meeting of the new year and new decade this Thursday, Jan. 23. The headline agenda Item is a resolution brought by Council Member Greg Casar that would effectively decriminalize the possession of small amounts of marijuana in Austin. If approved, per the resolution language, City Manager Spencer Cronk would be directed to "eliminate, to the furthest extent allowable under state law," arrests for marijuana possession if the Austin Police Department knows "the prosecuting entity will automatically reject the charges."

The "prosecuting entity" in question? District Attorney Margaret Moore and County Attorney David Escamilla, who in June joined other prosecutors around the state in declining to prosecute low-level possession of marijuana cases after a new state law legalizing industrial hemp required all evidence from marijuana (POM) cases to undergo expensive and lengthy lab testing to differentiate it from its legal cousin. Casar's resolution would also prevent APD from spending any money on developing any new lab tests that could determine the concentration of THC in suspected marijuana, or using city funds to access a third-party lab for the testing.

Although prosecutions of low-level POM cases stopped over the summer, the arrests did not. One fear of criminal justice activists is that the arrests may be sitting in a backlog now but could be revived before their two-year statute of limitations is up if APD gains access to the lab equipment necessary to determine THC levels in the seized evidence. The resolution would prevent those arrests from ever materializing into court dates, because it would bar APD from accessing the lab testing.

Casar explained the intent of the resolution at a press conference on Tuesday. Jan. 21: "We are not changing the criminal law," he said, "but effectively are choosing to not have penalties associated with low-level marijuana possession."

The resolution does not specify a precise weight that defines "low-level possession," because the amount varies according to law. In Texas, possession of 4 ounces or less of marijuana is a misdemeanor offense, but possession of 7 grams or more with the intent to sell is a felony - which would still warrant arrest and lab testing under the Council resolution. At the same Tuesday press conference, Emily Gerrick with the Texas Fair Defense Project explained that the resolution avoids defining a quantifiable weight for "low-level" possession because there could be instances where personal-use amounts of marijuana exceed

felony-level weights. For instance, if someone were arrested for carrying edibles: "Let's say you have a brownie with some marijuana in it," Gerrick told reporters, "It's going to be the entire weight of the brownie and not the weight of the plant substance in it. So you could very easily have a personal-use brownie but get to felony-level [weight]."

If the resolution is approved, Cronk is required to update Council on implementation by May 1.

Also on the agenda: five separate items that would result in a \$612,336 boost to funding for the Guided Paths program launched in October. Initially just a pilot, Guided Paths asked service providers to use their own funds to create a list of people experiencing homelessness who frequently camp around the Austin Resource Center for the **Homeless**, and work with them in a targeted way to reach housing stability. Since the pilot began, 18 individuals have been entered into a housing program, and another 60 are on a waiting list: 14 people have not vet been matched with a program that suits their needs; while three have not been seen since the initial survey was conducted, and another four are in long-term incarceration.

Based on those results, additional funding will be award-

ed to local care providers in the following amounts: \$102,056 each to the Salvation Army, Front Steps, Family Eldercare, and Caritas of Austin, and \$204,112 to Integral Care. Front Steps Executive Director Greg McCormack told the Chronicle that the nonprofit would use the funds to hire a new case manager to work exclusively with people participating in the Guided Paths program.

He added that the program was "not a magic wand" but could have a "trickling down effect" on people experiencing homelessness who've been resistant to engaging in services. "Fear and apprehension of the system is a huge barrier." McCormack explained, "Once they see someone in a similar situation get housed, the idea can pop into their head that maybe they can be housed if they engage with the system."

At a Council work session on Tuesday, Austin Public Health Director Stephanie Hayden said the goal was to expand the program to areas outside of Downtown in the coming months, and the injection of funding is meant to help the providers scale up their operations to make that possible.

The beefing up of the Guided Paths program comes as the city's homeless services undergo some bureaucratic shuffling. Lori Pampilo Harris, who was hired as the city's first-ever - and possibly last - Homeless Strategy Officer in September, announced just a month later that she was stepping down from the role. Her contract with the city expired on Jan. 3; she was initially poised to work as a consultant on the homelessness policy, but she ended up not taking that gig, so city officials are currently looking for a national expert to provide consulting services. A new department called the Homeless Services Division, residing under Austin Public Health, will assume the responsibilities that Pampilo Harris vacated. Vella Karman, currently an APH employee, will serve as interim chief of the new HSD for the time being, and the division's work will be overseen by Assistant City Manager Chris Shorter.

Meanwhile, city staff announced they are no longer pur-

suing the purchase of the Microtel property at 7704 Metro Center Drive, citing concern over zoning that would prevent the property from being converted into a longterm housing solution.


Other Items of note include a resolution from CM Paige Ellis that will direct the city manager to conduct a study into the ways litter gets into rivers, lakes, and creeks. The resolution also calls on Cronk to explore and pursue

immediate action on the baffling trend of people dumping electric scooters into the city's waterways. Another environmental Item, this one from CM Ann Kitchen, would authorize Cronk to spend up to \$100,000 to join a civil lawsuit opposing the Permian Highway Pipeline, which could pose a threat to Edwards Aquifer.

In zoning, the **Herrera house**, located at 1805 E. Third, is up for historic landmark status. The property served as the home to Consuelo Herrera Mendez. Mary Grace Herrera. and their niece, Diana Herrera Castañeda - three icons in Austin's Latinx community for their activism. The Historic Landmark Commission and the Planning Commission both gave their approval to awarding historic status to the site, but the current property owner opposes it.

Flawed, But Essential

PROVIDERS. VOLUNTEERS GEAR UP FOR ANNUAL PIT COUNT

Depending on who you ask in the homelessness services world, and how candid they're willing to be, the Point in Time **Count** is typically described as incomplete, flawed, or "mostly bullshit." But the annual census of people experiencing homelessness is required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and flawed though it may be, it's how the federal government determines what level of funding local groups are allocated toward efforts to reduce homelessness.

"Recently, HUD has been referring to it as a Point in Time estimate," Front Steps Executive Director Greg McCormack said of the count's imperfect methodology. "I like that a lot better." Like other service providers, Front Steps - which operates the **Austin Resource Center for the Homeless** - depends on the count, scheduled for Saturday morning, Jan. 25, because most HUD programs require inclusion of the number on funding applications. In 2019, Front Steps was able to connect 55 individuals with permanent supportive housing, thanks in part to HUD dollars. HUD uses the numbers from local PIT efforts to compile a report for Congress that gives an overview of homelessness across American cities. The number of people counted over the weeklong window when communities conduct the count is used to calculate how much funding the agency asks for to help pay for Continuum of Care services in those communities.

Any community receiving federal funds from HUD to help end homelessness is required to conduct the annual census, but local service providers are quick to point out that the PIT represents merely a rough estimate of the number of people experiencing homelessness in a community on a given night. Only the people that can be found on the streets or in a shelter are counted; that means people sleeping in their cars or deep in wooded areas are often overlooked. People in jail cells or hospital beds - who might otherwise be considered by HUD to be "chronically homeless" (i.e., homeless for 12 consecutive months or on four separate occasions totaling 12 months in a three-year period) – are not counted either.

So, when people say there are 2,225 people experiencing homelessness in the Austin area, they are referencing the 2019 PIT Count total, and they are not giving an accurate number. Another way to count people without stable housing is through the Homeless Management Information System, the database used by ECHO (Ending Community Homelessness Coalition) and its service provider partners to track people experiencing homelesness, which yields a much larger number.

But that number is not totally accurate either: If a person "self-resolves" their homelessness - as in, they find housing without help from a service provider - the HMIS cannot easily label those people as having exited the system. The HMIS num-



ber, then, is likely an overcount; realistically, the number of people experiencing homelessness in Austin is somewhere between the PIT Count and the HMIS one.

Still, the PIT Count is the number HUD uses to distribute funding (a 2017 analysis by ECHO found that about \$12 million of the \$30 million in governmental funding local providers received came from federal sources). It's also the number city leaders, advocates, and critics will point to for all of 2020 to illustrate the scale of the problem in the Austin-Travis County region. All told, it's important work, even though HUD does not provide any additional funding for it, so it is largely a volunteer effort.

ECHO had recruited about 800 volunteers

as the Chronicle went to press on Wednesday, and they're looking for another 200 or so to help with the counting before Saturday. Groups of roughly a dozen volunteers are assigned to one of 73 sections throughout the county, to one of three shifts from 3-9am, when people living without housing are more likely to be sleeping and easier to find. Each group has a team lead - someone who has participated in previous counts – to help organize ahead of time and to facilitate the work on the actual day. Team leads are given autonomy to coordinate and prepare their teams for the count; some do advance scouting in their section to give people living on the street or in encampments a heads up that they'll be coming by for the PIT.

The Election Ticker: From the Council Dais to Round Rock

Dueling Members A couple of City Council members have weighed in on the TX-25 Democratic primary battle between Julie Oliver and Heidi Sloan. Sloan got the nod from District 4 CM (and fellow Democratic Socialist) Greg Casar, while Oliver announced the support of former D1 CM Ora Houston. In a statement, Sloan called Casar a "role model" for organizing and governing, and Casar said,



"Heidi will be much more than just a member of Congress. She's building a movement." Oliver called Houston a "fiercely independent" voice on Council, committed to listening to the community she served, unafraid to stand up for them every single day. "I'm inspired by her leadership, her strength, and her courage." On Wednesday, Oliver also added CM Jimmy Flannigan to her supporters list...

Big Hitters for D.A. Moore In the race for Travis County District Attorney (or at least the Democratic nomination), incumbent Margaret Moore has started to roll out endorsements from Dem boldfaced names. Her website lists dozens, headlined by U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett, state Sen. Kirk Watson, Mayor Steve Adler, Travis County Judge Sarah Eckhardt, County Attorney David Escamilla, and a host of others, electeds and otherwise. Recently, the campaign has featured "Endorsement Shout-Outs!" – lengthy emails of support. Eckhardt's "shout-out" acknowledges the current public emphasis on "Criminal Justice Reform" and says Moore is the candidate who can best deliver it: "Bookings are down," she writes. "Jail population is down. Felony convictions for drug offenses are down. And diversion to effective drug treatment programs is up." She adds pointedly that Moore has "successfully prosecuted more sexual assault cases than the courts have seen in years." In his shout-out, Austin NAACP President **Nelson** Linder focuses on Moore's creation of a Civil Rights Unit and related Advisory Council to address discriminatory law enforcement. He calls Moore's 2016 election "a transcendent moment for Travis County, but also an important occurrence for the entire nation." ...

Also Noted Moore's list of endorsements is impressive, but longtime courthouse observers caution, "Remember Andy Brown." The former party chair ran for Travis County judge in 2014, his campaign kickoff featured dozens of Democratic headliners – and he also won the lion's share of Dem club endorsements. Who won the primary (and general) election? Now-two-term incumbent Travis County Judge Sarah Eckhardt.

D.A. challengers José Garza and Erin Martinson don't feature headline endorsement lists of public officials on their websites, but they've garnered other important nods. Early on, as the campaigns were beginning, Garza got a boost from the national Real Justice PAC (a Shaun King initiative), and more recently added the Austin **Democratic Socialists. Liberal Austin Democrats. UT University** Dems, and the Austin EMS Association. Martinson boasted the support of the Austin Firefighters Association, which has criticized the incumbent's approach to sexual assault prosecutions, plus the Circle C Area Democrats, Ed Scruggs of Texas Gun Sense (and the Mike Bloomberg 2020 campaign), former Chronicle (and Texas Monthly) reporter Audrey Duff, and a minor-key musical motif: Shawn Colvin, Kelly Willis, and Willis' spouse Bruce Robison...

Michelle Friedman, a five-year veteran, told us she knows most of the locations where people sleep in the area because she lives nearby and volunteers with animal welfare groups that work. She says she finds it useful to draw a map for her team that breaks the section into smaller subsections.

Friedman's custom map of her section – number 66, which is bounded north by Stassney Lane, south by Slaughter Lane, between I-35 and Manchaca Road – marks

overpasses under which people live and buildings people frequently sleep behind, making it easier for volunteers – especially first-timers – to find people. Friedman explained that preparing vol-

unteers ahead of the count is helpful, because the morning-of can bring a mixture of excitement and tension. "Going behind office buildings and exploring parts of the city you won't see in your normal day-to-day is exciting," Friedman told us, "but working up the courage to talk to someone in these circumstances is difficult. It's kind of like starting a race. Once you get going, you're fine, but when you're looking around for someone to wake up and have this personal conversation with, it's uncomfortable."

Those personal, uncomfortable conversations are critical to the local impact of the count, because they help give a clearer picture of *who* is experiencing homelessness in our community, and *why* they're in that situation. Volunteers gather this information through a survey, which will be conducted digitally for the first time this year. Questions include how long an individual has been homeless, if they have a physical or mental health concern preventing them

from maintaining an income or housing, and what kind of services they are currently engaging in.

Matt Mollica, ECHO's executive director, told us these questions are important because the data gathered helps determine what kinds of programs are funded to meet the specific needs of people experiencing homelessness in Austin. "If we see an increase in people that need permanent supportive housing," Mollica offered as a potential example, "when we're considering our funding from HUD and going after

bonus funds, we might go for more support there instead of in rapid rehousing."

The arduous work of the PIT Count is about the vulnerable people living on our streets who need connections to services, but the effort is also edifying for the volunteers. The uncomfortable conversations described by Friedman bring housed individuals face-to-face with the realities of what life is like without a home. Regardless of how empathetic a person may be to the

plight of homelessness, talking with a person who has nowhere else to sleep other than in their car or under a highway can humanize the problem in a way that passing individuals on the street can't.

Cara Santucci, a first-time volunteer, told us this was part of the reason she signed up for the count. "Homelessness is such a complex problem," she said. "No one person's story is the same. I feel like understanding that is badly needed in our community, especially among the people posting hateful stuff online."

Speaking of which, does anyone know if Gov. **Greg Abbott** is free on Saturday morning? Maybe he could learn something about the Texans he's so quick to demonize on Twitter.

STATE HAS 34 DAYS TO DECIDE ROSA JIMENEZ'S FATE

At a hearing Jan. 14, U.S. Magistrate Judge Andrew Austin asked why Travis County District Attorney Margaret Moore would want to subject Rosa Jimenez to a retrial. "Has she read the four different judges' orders who have said they think this is a very infirm trial," asked Austin, "and there is likely an innocent woman who is sitting in a jail for 17 years?"

A spokesman for the D.A.'s Office said no decision has been made on whether to retry Jimenez, who was found guilty in 2005 of choking 21-month-old Bryan Gutierrez to death by shoving a wad of paper towels

down his throat. But time is short: U.S. Judge Lee Yeakel has ordered that Jimenez be released or retried by Feb. 25. And according to the **Attorney** General's Office, a retrial is all but certain; unidentified members of the D.A.'s Office who were present at Tuesday's hearing also supported the idea.

In an effort to keep Jimenez in prison until the state's appeals are exhausted, the A.G. asked Judge Austin to push the deadline back indefinitely, arguing any attempt to transfer the undocumented Jimenez to Travis County for a new trial might allow officers of Immigration and Customs Enforcement to snatch her en route and spirit her to Mexico, depriving the state of the retrial. Austin easily dismantled the argument, asking what evidence the state had for their ICE theory. Assistant Attorney General Jon Meador stuttered, "Well, just the unknown factors."

If the state's request is granted, the process would easily take more than a year, and Jimenez has developed stage IV chronic kidney disease. According to Vanessa Potkin, Jimenez's attorney from the **Innocence Project**, she'll need a transplant. Being in custody, said Potkin, "she would never get on a list, she would never even be considered. If the state drags this out it will turn into a death sentence for Ms. Jimenez."

Jimenez was babysitting Gutierrez at her North Austin apartment in 2003 when he staggered into the kitchen, choking. The 20-year-old Jimenez - seven months' pregnant and with her own 1-year-old daughter - later said she gave him the Heimlich

> maneuver and tried to remove whatever was obstructing his breathing, but he passed out. Screaming, she carried him to the apartment next door. EMS arrived and pulled a mass of compacted paper towels from Gutierrez's windpipe. By then his brain was severely damaged. He died in hospice three months later.

At the 2005 trial, prosecutors called three expert witnesses who insisted there was no way Gutierrez could have gotten the paper towels stuck in his throat on his own. Jimenez's trial attorney had limited funds - and the judge refused requests for money to hire the same caliber of experts the state had called - so he put a medical examiner from Connecticut on the stand. Under cross examination, the examiner got rattled. In the hallway during a recess, he told prosecutors to "go fuck [them]selves." When cross examination resumed, he was asked about the comment and responded, "That's an exactly correct quote." Travis County

Elfant in the Room Notoriously mild-mannered Travis County Tax Assessor-Collector and Voter Registrar Bruce Elfant took uncharacteristic umbrage at a remark by county attorney candidate (and Mayor Pro Tem) **Delia Garza**, who in a recent interview suggested that the C.A.'s Office could be more aggressive in fighting state **GOP voter suppression.** Referring obliquely to last year's dispute with the secretary of state over alleged noncitizen voters (Sec. David Whitley eventually resigned over the issue). Garza told the Chronicle that the county attorney might have been more defiant over voter rolls, "rather than just turning them over on demand" ("Former County Judge Rails Against Delia Garza," Jan. 10).

Garza didn't mention Elfant, but Elfant objected to Garza's indirect implication that Travis County had too readily deferred to the state's inaccurate process. Elfant and his team had devoted large resources to reviewing Whitley's list, file by file, concluding that it was riddled with errors and unreliable, and, he told the Chronicle, "When

the SoS asked me to send 'show me your papers' letters to about 4.600 individuals who they believed were not citizens. I refused. I made the decision to file a brief in the federal lawsuit opposing the SoS' actions and appreciate the county attorney's role in laying the legal foundation to support my position. We won that case and I am proud of my role in opposing what was an unconstitutional attempt by the SoS and Texas A.G. to suppress voters." (For the record, as an election official, Elfant doesn't endorse candidates or get involved in campaigns.)

Garza responded that she hadn't meant to criticize Elfant and instead was trying to make a broader point about pushing back against state attempts at voter suppression, or similar efforts. "I was talking about trying to empower our county officials, and I was using that [Whitley episode] as an example. I could have framed it better and said we just need to make sure we aren't handing over sensitive information." If elected, she says, she intends to provide support to all county officials, and hopes they will learn to "expect more" from the county attorney's office...

Then There Were Five The TX-31 congressional race once boasted at least 11 declared Democratic candidates for the Williamson/Bell County seat that includes a growing sliver of Austin. (Three Republicans have filed to challenge incumbent Rep. John Carter.) The list has since devolved to five, according to the announcement of a candidate forum this coming Saturday, sponsored by eight Williamson County Democratic clubs. Still standing: musician



and retirement consultant Eric Hanke, computer engineer Donna Imam, primary care doctor (and 2018 candidate) Christine Eady Mann. management consultant **Dan Janjigian**, and Round Rock City Council Member **Tammy Young**. The forum will be held at the Round Rock Library, 216 Main St., Sat., Jan. 25, 1-5pm. - Michael King

Judge **Charlie Baird** later said, "It would be hard to imagine a worse witness." Jimenez was convicted and given a 99-year sentence.

Two years later, Jimenez's story was the centerpiece of an award-winning Mexican documentary, Mi Vida Dentro, which

highlighted the unfair trials given to undocumented women immigrants in America. Mexico's then-President-elect, Enrique Peña Nieto, advocated for Jimenez. Soon, the Innocence Project, an organization working to exonerate the wrongly accused, came on to the case. They appealed Jimenez's sentence and brought in a group of nationally known experts who, contradicting the state, said kids do indeed get large objects stuck in

their throats and that Gutierrez's death was likely a tragic accident. In 2010, Judge Baird threw out the conviction and ordered a new trial.


Predictably, his order was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals, which agreed Jimenez's attorney had been "outmatched"

but said the Constitution doesn't require equal sums to be spent on both sides of a case. The Innocence Project then moved their appeal to the federal side of the process and, eight years after Judge Baird threw out the conviction, Judge Austin rec-

> ommended the same, saving Jimenez had not received a fair trial. Yeakel agreed and set the Feb. 25 deadline.

> As per the court's instructions, Jimenez will soon be moved to the Travis County jail in preparation for her release or retrial. This is where she delivered her second child, a boy, in 2003 while awaiting trial. Since then, she's had little contact with her family; she's never held her son and hasn't seen her mother in

Mexico, as rules prevent the families of those convicted of a crime from getting visas to visit them. Phone calls are limited to five minutes every six months. If released, Potkin said, Jimenez will likely return to Mexico, where her family lives. "All she wants to do is go home." - Brant Bingamon

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To Serve and Protect

How does school district policing support local students?

Last fall, Manor Independent School District announced its intent to create its own police department, to be in place next school year after its contract with the Travis County Sheriff's Office ends. Round Rock ISD, the metro area's second-largest school district, will likely do the same in the future, after both city and county law enforcement agencies gave notice they would be withdrawing their officers from RRISD schools. With increased interest in Central Texas in more progressive approaches to criminal justice and awareness of the impact of current approaches on youth, does this trend represent progress, or does it open the door to overpolicing in the classrooms?

Most students in the Austin metro area attend school in districts with their own police forces, and leaders in those departments understandably see having in-district policing as offering more control to respond to the needs of those students. In Austin ISD, Assistant Police Chief Chris Evoy said school resource officers (SROs) are there to serve four functions: law enforcement, mentorship, counseling and mental health services, and the development of educational opportunities for students.

It is the relationship function, he said, that differentiates district officers from those who are employed by local municipalities and may still have to split time between community calls and school duties. "Kids want to build relationships, they want to be able to go to someone, and we want our school resource officers to be those relationships," Evoy said.

Round Rock ISD is still working to chart out its road to creating a district police department, after the Round Rock Police Department and the Williamson County Sheriff's Office notified RRISD that they would no longer be able to provide officers to the SRO program after 2021. But district officials see this as an opportunity to

address concerns that have arisen from community members about the role of police in schools – including bias in the application of school discipline policies and excessive police intervention for minority and special education children.

Take, for instance, "Justin," a now-14-year-old student in a local middle school who suffers from severe mental health challenges, which have only been compounded by the fact that he has been repeatedly criminalized by the school system and arrested by district officers. Justin was arrested for the first time at the age of 9, after a tug-of-war over a basketball led to a teacher falling and assault charges being filed against Justin. Over the next five years, Justin would be handcuffed in school and led out over nonviolent offenses more than a dozen times.

In another case, local activist Meme Styles' son was charged with assault after a "Locking up a student, what that does is take the student away from the very resources that they need. ... little girl fell over in her chair and hit her head on the ground following the son's decision to move his foot, on which the little girl's chair was resting.

"We had just had some [community] conversations about the lack of representation of black kids in GT [gifted and talented]," said Styles, whose son was at Kelly Lane Middle School in Pflugerville ISD at the time. "I think the principal saw that it was me who put [those sessions] on, and needless to say, [my son] was not charged with assault."

A few weeks later, however, Styles said she got a call from a friend whose child was facing the exact same situation, and at the same school. "After that I said, "There has to be something going on here. Two white girls, two black boys. ... Why are we instantly going to an assault charge?" Styles said.

Styles, who is president and founder of Measure, an Austin-based nonprofit that touts as its mission its emphasis on using data and education to empower community members to solve community problems, decided to take a look at the data to determine if there was actually a racial disparity in school discipline decisions in Pflugerville ISD schools. The research team found a disproportionate number of Black students were facing assault charges – Black students were being charged with assault 3.5 times more than their white counterparts.

"Of course, it's not a local problem," Styles said. "It's a national problem. So what we did then was mobilize the community to inform them that it's a problem. ... A lot of times, people don't know what to do with the data. Luckily, we do."


The Measure team convened a full panel, which included the chief of police, representatives from Pflugerville ISD, and community members; Styles said that what stuck out most from that meeting was how moved the officers were by the community's involvement. "When we first sat down

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police departments."

SERVE AND PROTECT CONTINUED FROM P.18 with [Pflugerville ISD Police Chief Patrick Petherbridge] as a community, he said it was the first time that community members had ever reached out to him," said Styles, reflecting on the emotion felt by all parties. "This tells me there is definitely a lack of communication that goes out from those

Round Rock ISD Director of Safety and Security Jeffrey Yarbrough said creating its own police department gives the district an opportunity to address some of these issues around bias, with officers sometimes being too quick to criminalize students and funnel them into the school-to-prison pipeline.

"We've considered providing a level of diversity training" and racial equity training, Yarbrough said. The state of Texas mandates that all police officers take diversity training, racial profiling training, and civilian interaction training, but bringing the department in-house will also allow the district's officers to undergo mental health training and racial equity training, and to examine more the concept of restorative practices. Yarbrough said.

"Having our own [police department] we're looking for diversionary methods and other resources" to resolve conflicts on campuses, Yarbrough said, adding that arresting students should be considered an absolute last resort and only in clear criminal cases, such as bringing weapons on campus.

"Locking up a student, what that does is take the student away from the very resources that they need," Yarbrough said. "Whether that's a counselor, whether that's social services, whether that's someone in the mental health department. ... Arresting someone has to be the last resort if there are other resources you can allocate towards that student.

"It's doing nothing but traumatizing that student," he continued. "We do not want to traumatize our students, we want to make sure they're getting the help that they need from whatever resources that we can allocate to them."

Evoy said school officers, through their relationships with students, also have the ability to evaluate situations on a case-bycase basis. "We have to look at situations," he said. "We always get the families involved, we always try to get all resources available before we try to [arrest] a student ... because the whole point of what we're trying to do here is provide those services so we can help that behavior, so they can get an education and eventually graduate."

But Evoy understands, as others do, that including subjective evaluation metrics opens the door further for individual biases to be the determining factor in who receives which consequences for which offenses. "It's very important that we understand




diversity, we understand how to serve our community," Evoy said. "Our officers, we always strive to make sure that we take steps to get that additional training and make sure our officers understand that ... so we can better serve our students and our staff ... making sure we treat people equally and fairly and we understand culture and

Styles says that data on policing shows that not much has changed in the two and a half years since that Pflugerville community meeting was held. But she remains optimistic that the community, now armed with data and advocacy know-how, can continue to hold departments accountable and push for change. Already, she is encouraged by a shift in attitudes of officers and a willingness to openly and transparently discuss issues around racial bias.

Currently, another Measure team is working to raise awareness around the issues of childhood criminalization and the public health repercussions for students who are so impacted. "The biggest value here is that parents are aware there's an issue," she said, and districts seem "willing, when reached out to, to work towards collaborative solutions."

"Piecing It Together: Austin Graffiti Art 1984-2004" opens Jan. 24 at the Emma S. Barrientos Mexican American Cultural Center. In stark contrast to the venue, the artists featured in the show have short names: Sae, Rage, Reks, Jibs, Wake. But those names loom large when you talk about graffiti in Austin. Painted over and over again in seemingly endless variations of color and form, the names established this form of public visual expression in our city. They started back in the Eighties, when the movies Wild Style, Beat Street, and Breakin' struck diverse chords in young people, as did the emergence of skateboarding, punk posters, and gangs in popular culture. Those inspirations got the artists in this exhibit working. Their high-pressure aerosol art was made and disappeared rapidly. Its ephemeral nature lends itself to lore and checkered oral histories, which are explored in "Piecing It Together." On Feb. 15, exhibit curators Nathan Nordstrom and Chale Nafus will lead a panel discussion with many of the showcased artists. Their stories highlight the legacies of hip-hop culture in Austin. Theirs are passionate stories about Austin

That's clear just by asking them to talk about their names. In an email, Jibs wrote, "My name Jibs was given to me by a NBK (No Boundaries Krew) member named Worm. My previous name was Temper. After

Where Credit Is Due

"Piecing It Together" captures the lore and legends of the first generation of Austin graffiti artists

traveling to the Bay Area and meeting a OG (Original Gangster) writer named Temp. I moved on." Some names are more vibe based, as Reks notes: "Since about 1993, I've been writing Reks, also known as Rezareks or Rez. I was kind of reckless growing up, always breaking or spraining something, so it kind of made sense. Plus I really liked those letters and their flow for painting. I am usually the one who falls off the scaffolding and breaks a leg or sprains an ankle. I tried a few other names but nothing stuck." Some have endured. Rage wrote, "I've had my allius [sic] for 30 yrs. It's also my street name or nickname." Sae started out ambitiously in sixth grade as GrandMaster, then wrote Skem. He says, "There was a writer in New York putting up SAY. I thought that was cool - only three letters. I really liked drawing the letters 'S' and 'A' but didn't want to be a biter. So I changed the 'Y' to an 'E' [and] came up with SAE. After that I went full throttle with the Art of Graffiti!"

Every artist can tell you how they got started in graffiti. Sae – now a graphic designer and a successful commercial artist who has wrapped marine vessels with cool designs – remembers specific influences from Austin's early graffiti scene. "Skam, Rage, Rab, Nave come to mind," he says. "I met Nave in sixth grade. That is who introduced me to Austin Graffiti. His parents moved him from the East side to far North where I was at. Nave was associated with the 'TOPS' crew."

Reks came to graffiti via skateboarding. He says, "In the 80s I remember a full production that showed up one day on the back of a grocery store by my house by Animal and Tutor that really inspired me. I began painting ditches that we skateboarded. Skateboarding and Graffiti were my creative outlets of expression growing up in Austin. I can't say it always kept me out of trouble but [it] did keep me busy and often paid well. Painting to me is self-medicating

and relaxing. Society either loved it or hated it growing up, but now [graffiti] tends to be a little more accepted. Graffiti gifted me with a Krew of 25 years (No Bounds [Boundaries] Krew) who are all like family!"

Similarly Wake writes, "The NBK crew really paved the way for me as an artist. I met them through skateboarding after seeing their art, when Blondies skateshop would have skate demos and DJ sets and all the local skaters would come and chill. Jib, Reks, and Worm were the first few that I painted with, in 1998. I met Sloke later on through graffiti and First Thursdays, when we used to do live painting and sell canvases on South Congress in the early 2000s. Sloke has always been a mentor for me. I think he really represents Austin on the graffiti art front and is a very talented artist."

Sloke – the art name of exhibit co-curator Nathan Nordstrom – says, "The vibrant mural scene we now have was built by many, many people. You've got to give credit where credit is due." These artists have a lot of respect for the pioneers of graffiti in Austin. The exhibit has a wall of photos dedicated to the memory of Skam. Alfred "Skam" Martinez was by all accounts a mentor and the best at doing masterpieces. His large colorful letters and stylish characters are still visible on Pleasant Valley Road

near Lakeshore Drive. He and Robert "Seks" Kane Herrera expressed the culture of Austin and continue to influence generations. These days, Herrera is restoring some of the graffiti and murals that survive through the group Arte Texas.

Art has transformative qualities. It's a personal challenge, as Reks says: "I'm constantly learning and trying different things. It never is the same, even though I

am writing the same letters, but I always try and come correct." Wake writes, "It benefits the community by providing a visibly positive outreach, making neighborhoods and city areas more inviting. But also showing the youth there can be a future in art." I agree that art matters. As Rage says, "Graffiti influences my life to paint the world beautiful and to spread the movement. Graffiti also saved my life."

Burning Debate

In Jarrott Productions' The Niceties, the frictions in American society catch fire in an academic's office

Check your pulse.

If it's currently beating somewhat faster than normal, the way it might when you feel threatened, say, or are in a heated argument or other situation fraught with tension, then that just means your pulse is in sync with that of the nation - a nation in distress over divisions within it that deepen daily, with increasingly bitter and hateful speech hurled from side to side.

It means your pulse is also in sync with that of The Niceties, which is definitely in sync with that of the nation. The heart of Eleanor Burgess' of-the-moment drama Trinity Street Playhouse, 901 Trinity is the racing thumpwww.jarrottproductions.com

thump-thump of our country's current uncivil discourse -

over race, over privilege, over gender, over generational character - and the play's two characters cover all of those topics with the same rancorous wrangling that can be heard across the land these days. And with every angry escalation of the issues here. Jarrott Productions' staging quickens the heart.

Oh, not at first. Early on, the play communicates no more tension than what a university student feels while awaiting her professor's feedback on a paper. And said professor's dry, literally old-school office (it's at an lvy League college) would hardly seem a setting for combustible conflict. But as David Mamet's Oleanna instructed us a quarter of a century back, all it takes is one teacher, one student, and one sensitive subject treated insensitively, and that office might as well have been doused with gasoline and a match struck. It's going up in flames, with - spoiler, not a spoiler – the professor's job and reputation.

So it goes here. The subject this time is history - specifically, the American Revolution. The student, Zoe, has built her paper on the novel thesis that the revolt wouldn't have succeeded had it not been for slavery. With the black underclass in chains, it couldn't rise up and conduct its own, more radical rebellion that might have derailed the moderate white one. The professor, Janine, isn't buying it. A scholar of revolutions – a fact telegraphed by portraits of Walesa, Mandela, Zapata, and Washington on her walls - she

insists the historical record doesn't support the idea. To which Zoe responds, the historical record doesn't include black voices, since those who were enslaved weren't allowed to read or write. Because Janine, who's white, is less interested in the cultural thrust of the thesis than the historical method that proves

> it, she comes off as racially tone-deaf. which pushes Zoe, who's black, to fight harder for her theory. In the course of their struggle, we learn more about each: Zoe's a social justice warrior who spends every avail-

> > able moment on causes, comes from a privileged background, and hates libraries; Janine was a feminist activist back in the day, has a workingclass background, is a

lesbian with a wife, and disdains research on the net. Much of this info, though, ends up fueling the feud between the two, as in: "You millennials." "OK, boomer."

To Burgess' credit, neither figure is ever totally right or totally wrong, and the actors here work hard to keep both fully human. As Janine, Francesca Christian projects patrician authority - upright, composed, always speaking with certainty. We see Janine's vanity and patronizing air, but Christian also reveals her vulnerability, as when she talks of learning what a lesbian is, how it gave her a word for something she felt inside but believed she was alone in feeling. The actor doesn't sentimentalize it in the telling; she speaks plainly, opening up Janine in a way that lets us see her instead of her emotions. As Zoe, Jacqui Calloway embodies the spirit of youthful activism - confident, ever-ready to take a stand. to speak out. That's what she does with Janine, despite her professor's age, experience, and power over her academically. The way Calloway's Zoe argues on conveys clearly the character's boldness and strength of will, but at times that tips over into willfulness and impatience, so Calloway shows us how Zoe will overreach or betray her own interests.

Director Jeremy Rashad Brown does his best to make this an even match (though he sometimes moves his actors into awkward spots around the stage, often facing the audience instead of each other). But Burgess has tipped the scales. Janine never quite lets go of her entitlement, ever after being laid low, so she never really grasps Zoe's position; you can't walk a mile in someone else's shoes if you don't take your own shoes off. And when Zoe speaks of her exhaustion being black in a white society - "I am so tired, so tired of remembering for the both of us" - there's no reply someone white can make that carries

Zoe's line is one of many in The Niceties that gives it timeliness and urgency. Its heartbeat is hard and fast and now. If that isn't important to you, well, check your pulse.



Most grief experiences involve a period of terrible isolation. Then, after a time - days, months, years - we find that we aren't quite so alone. It's not healing, exactly, but the awareness that almost everyone is broken in one way or another offers a strange comfort.

That's the beauty of Tiny Beautiful Things, onstage now at Austin Playhouse. The production offers proof that even when the events of our lives turn brutal, we're not as alone as we might think.

Tiny Beautiful Things is a play that Nia Vardalos adapted from the book by Chervl Strayed, author of Wild. The book compiles advice columns that Straved wrote for the online column "Dear Sugar." Insightful, poetic, and confessional, the pieces are a reminder that it's possible to discover beauty and meaning in our brokenness.

Onstage, the letters make for curious stagecraft. Under the direction of Rosalind Faires (a Chronicle contributor and daughter of Chronicle Arts Editor Robert Faires), the character arc of Sugar (played by Barbara Chisholm - wife of Robert, mother of Rosalind, and, I would imagine, co-owner of the family pets) isn't conventionally shaped. Sugar doesn't start out as some naive ingenue or bad-seed type in need of transformation. There aren't lessons that her letter writers (played by Lowell Bartholomee, Crystal Bird Caviel, and John R. Christopher) can teach her about humility or compassion. If anything, it's a slow fulfillment of Sugar's need to make use of her own traumas and past mistakes. Through these letters, she finds herself confirmed in the conviction that humans are creatures of hope and strength. All this happens in the family basement (designed by Mike Toner).

Back to that word "humility." One of the let-



ters in Strayed's book that doesn't make the cut except in passing is from a young, struggling, wannabe author. The writer complains how she knows she's got great talent but struggles to actually produce a book. Sugar advises her to accept a little humility. Let go of any notion of greatness, and just do the work.

The single artistic choice that undermines the production is the disregard of Strayed's own humility. On the page, Sugar reads as someone who offers rather than advises. She remains in the trenches with her readers – setting her own boundaries, day by day. and facing her own mistakes. In this show, though. Sugar speaks with vast assurance and confidence. She's figured it all out and is eager to share. The script doesn't really construct Sugar's character with dimensions beyond what her own writing reveals. Rather, it's a director's choice to make Sugar bold and eager, one that I'd argue doesn't suit Sugar's actual voice or the heart of her message.

The vulnerability at the heart of "Dear Sugar" comes through best when Bartholomee speaks to Sugar as a bereft father mourning the loss of his son. He shows what grief is like in those long, horrible years after the first blows have fallen, when one is simply trying to survive - "working through the unimaginable," to borrow a line from Hamilton. He's quiet and honest. His words are devastating. Sugar does her best to meet him where he is.

All the performers in Austin Playhouse's production of Tiny Beautiful Things are excellent actors who do great work. Faires is a strong and confident director with a knack for balance and pacing. What falls short in this staging stems from a central choice of how to convey Sugar's unique voice. To an audience coming to Sugar's words for the first time or with a different take on her writing, the experience could be different. As Sugar herself might say, "There's something here for you, Sweet Pea. Do your best." - Elizabeth Cobbe



"PRINTAUSTIN: THE CONTEMPORARY PRINT"



Let's talk about what's called "conceptual art," please, if only for a few sentences.

Because sometimes there's something in a gallery, something that's part of a group show or solo show: or it's the sole piece, an entire installation of some kind, commandeering an entire venue. And you look at it, and it doesn't really do much for your sense of pattern or design or color; it doesn't really please or interestingly offend the eye. You know? Your response to its ocular impact is mostly, "WHUT?"

And then there's a separate bit of text accompanying the thing, or the artist is there to explicate what you've been looking at. And, all too often, when you've been made to understand what they were going for, your reaction remains pretty much along the lines of "WHUT?" And you're glad for the artist, that they were able to bring a thing into the world that hadn't been in the world before, and glad (and maybe slightly jealous) of their privilege in having it displayed for public consumption. But you're also left wondering – because the piece's surface hardly seems worth the effort of raising your evelids for a glimpse of it and its "concept" is ultimately mediocre - why anyone other than an art therapist is supposed to give a shit about it in the first place.

But then there are creations of conceptual art - rare, as ever with everything, per Sturgeon's law - that look like nothing much at all ... but once you're given the key of secondary information, you're sort of stunned, looking at it anew, and you think, "Holy mother of gods, this artist is a fucking genius!"



What's the most rare thing, it seems to me. is when a concept has a sufficient level of depth or even just cleverness and complexity of execution that its rendition will knock you out smiling - and, as if mere lagniappe, it's also visually and/or texturally one of the more fascinating objects your senses have been treated to. You encounter something like that, and you almost weep for the beauty of its existence; you have an acquisitive nature and naught but a journo's salary, and you curse the fates that have relentlessly supplied the wrong numbers on your habitual lottery ticket.

Are you up, citizen, for a bit of your own

similar weeping and cursing? Because Sumi Perera's 2B or Not 2B is part of "The Contemporary Print" at Big Medium Gallery, and it's just the creation to make you respond like that. (It's a bit scary, too, that much of what else is on display at Big Medium in the diverse group show curated by Claudia Zapata for PrintAustin is of a similar power and beauty; but we're considering just this piece here.)

Listen: Perera's piece, a series of prints in book form, was "inspired by sound waves generated by the sound of 2B and non-2B graphite pencil leads writing the phrase 'to be or not to be' on different substrates. These sound waves

were re-drawn, using various metalpoint styli: gold, silver, brass, copper, tin, aluminium, zinc, platinum. Other audio recordings ... generated sonic wave patterns ... of different [voicings] of 'to be or not to be' from famous TV sketch comedies and film, poets, and a Congolese interpreter. Pre-etched zinc plates of architectural features, were stripped and recycled to make the wave patterns. The plates were deeply ... etched [and] aquatinted to achieve embossing. These were inked using viscosity methods - both intaglio and relief roll inking - which were then curved to simulate wave patterns and placed upon a rolled gradient of color. Electroconductive ink channels run on the paper and connect to a control pad programmed with 12 tracks of 'to be or not to be' interpretations."

Mind feeling blown yet, reader? But you've gained this information because you chose to read it here. Your reviewer learned it because such was the complexly compelling beauty of Perera's industry's result (the thing itself, beyond context) that his curiosity was piqued to the point of mania: What's behind this controlled explosion of visual brilliance into our too-often humdrum world? And so he helplessly sought the answer in the show's catalog. Helplessly, I say, because you look at 2B or Not 2B and, never mind Hamlet's feigned madness or ghostly father, you want to somehow wear the piece as raiment if you're ever called to attend the court of the King in Yellow. Because it's certain that His Xanthic Majesty would note your adornment and command that, as sure as tears unshed shall dry and die in lost Carcosa, no harm may e'er befall the wearer of such a divine work.

Or, to repeat more simply, and especially after having looked further into Perera's career thus far: "Holy mother of gods, this artist is a fucking genius!"

The Interurban Railway Museum in Plano fills a former Texas Electric Railway depot with the in-depth story of how the intercity railroads operated. For nearly 50 years interurban railroads connected a large section of Texas from Denison to Waco.

In the early 20th century, self-propelled electric railroad cars were the cutting edge of transportation. Waco had an electric streetcar system as early as 1891. Rail companies operating between communities in Texas peaked at 13 in 1913, with almost 500 miles of track. This included systems in El Paso, Houston, and Bryan.

The largest of these privately owned railroads, the **Texas** Electric Railway Company, owned more than 200 miles of track. With 35 major stops on the line, the railroad connected to Denison, Fort Worth, Cleburne, Terrell, Waco, Denton, and Corsicana from a Dallas depot.

Between 1917 and 1926, Texas Electric claimed to have carried 31 million passengers without a fatality. Not only did the railroad carry commuters, shoppers, and tourists, but also freight and mail. The cars had two passenger compartments, were attached to an overhead wire, and were operated by a lone motorperson.

Texas Electric Railway officially died on Dec. 31, 1948, replaced by paved roads, automobiles, and bus service.

The Interurban Railway Museum, 901 E. 15th St. in Plano, contains the last vestiges of the transportation system, including



a railcar. Texas Electric was replaced in 1996 by the longest light-rail system in the U.S. (DART) with 93 miles of track. Very little of the interurban systems remain; Corsicana has one of the old cars at its visitor center, and the downtown Fort Worth rail station displays a car used from 1924 to 1934.

Immigrant Song: From Iran to Austin

Chef Amir Hajimaleki and his family honor the fundamentals of Persian cuisine at their restaurants

An Iranian immigrant, chef Amir Hajimaleki is currently bringing his fourth, fifth, and sixth restaurants to fruition in Austin. "Growing up in Iran – in a place that is beautiful and has amazing people, but is surrounded by so much violence – the one thing I remember people always being happy about was sitting around a table enjoying amazing food. At that moment they weren't thinking about what was going on in the world, just enjoying good company and good food. That's what hooked me, that's what got me into this business: I want to create that experience for people," he says.

The executive chef and co-owner of award-winning District Kitchen + Cocktails and Oasthouse Gastropub – along with his partner/brother Ali, who handles behind-the-scenes operations – designs their bur-

geoning empire around food and family as a way to celebrate their heritage and honor the journey, one full of love and hardship. "I was born in the middle of the war between Iran and Iraq, so the first few years of my life that I can remember were kind of hectic."

Hajimaleki's family moved to the United States from Iran when he was 8, in 1993, and landed in Denver for less than a year before settling in Austin near his maternal family. "Man, I didn't speak a lick of English when I moved here. And neither did my mom or brother, but my dad spoke a little because before the revolution he had visited. At home we always spoke in Farsi, and we still do a lot." He attributes his quick grasp of the new language to some "really great ESL teachers" in Austin ISD and being young and fully immersed.

The biggest culture shock, however, was the food. "Food culture in Iran is big, and it's known in Iran that you don't go to restaurants to get great food, you go to someone's home. It's just kind of above and beyond hospitality – whatever you want, it's there.

"My grandma is a phenomenal cook, and so is my mom, and we grew up eating extremely fresh food cooked daily, extremely seasonal food. You didn't go to these markets and have all this frozen stuff. It was just fresh. This is what's in season, so this is what we're eating. Moving to the United States was very different,

naturally, so in the beginning, it was a lot of fast food. I went from a very active, skinny kid to, after being here a vear, an overweight kid, just because of eating in school. I don't know if it's still like that, but we had a lot of fried stuff, mac & cheese. None of it was stuff I was accustomed to eating, but yeah, I loved fried chicken, McDonald's, and soda - a treat in Iran, at least in our household. My mom made sure we had fresh fruit juices, so anytime we got a Coke in a bottle it was a treat. Coming here, it's everywhere, and if you want it, you can have it. That was a big culture shock for us, but I mean, who doesn't like a good cheeseburger?"

At home, his mother and grandmother were still dedicated to home-cooked meals, and as long as he can remember, even while very young in Iran, Hajimaleki was in the kitchen watching them cook. "There are so many dishes, and they have all the little tricks, and I refer to them a lot. That's why seasonality is so important to me – that's how I grew up eating."

Popular dishes in the Hajimaleki house were kabobs and ghormeh sabzi, an herb stew often made with lamb or beef. "That's the culture of the cuisine: a lot of stews with rice. My favorite growing up was an eggplant stew that has these sun-dried limes in it - delicious. And yogurt is a common condiment, so there's an herb yogurt and a spinach one, all these different flavors, and salads and stuff. And a lot of different pickling – what we call torshi. With any chef you talk to about balancing food, pickling or fermenting comes up. In our culture that's how it is, and we grew up with a balance of flavors and textures. We definitely ate really well - not necessarily expensive, but very labor-intensive food.



My mom, bless her heart, that's what she did. She took good care of us."

He learned a lot afterward, too, After high school, Hajimaleki attended Le Cordon Bleu in Austin while working at Freda's Seafood Grille, and then worked at Kona Grill in San Antonio, where he met chef Rene Melendes, who would become his industry mentor and close friend. After attaining executive chef status at Kona at 21 years old, Hajimaleki moved to Baton Rouge, La., for a few years before running the flagship Kona in Dallas. "I feel like Louisiana was very similar to Iranian families as far as how passionate they are about food and cooking at home. It was so cool to see - it's very family-[centric] and people cook and get together over a good meal and that's also how it is in Iran."

Amir and Ali, with the help of their uncle. opened their first restaurant, District Kitchen + Cocktails on Slaughter Lane, in the Circle C neighborhood in 2013. District (which boasts a second location on Anderson Lane since 2019) showcases Amir's Middle Eastern, French, Cajun, and Asian cuisine knowledge with seasonal rotating menus, craft cocktails, and weekend brunches.

And in 2015, the brothers opened their second restaurant, Oasthouse Gastropub - serving elevated European pub fare with a focus on supporting local farms - in Northwest Austin's Four Points neighborhood. But it always comes back to the family, who are his best, and harshest, critics.

The Hajimaleki eye and palate for detail goes back many generations, and Amir claims his

grandfather is his hardest critic of all: "He's been married to my grandma for over 50 years and he's been eating her food every day. If he doesn't like something she makes, oh man, it's on, and they're going back and forth - it's hilarious. But yeah, he's tough. I'll never forget when we had cold soup on the menu, he came in and ordered it and I got so much shit for that. He's like, 'What's wrong with you? We don't serve cold soups!' I said, 'Well, it's summer, it's corn, it's delicious.' So if I please him, I know it's good."

He adds, "My mom loves our food, but she'll also give me a hard time about things that many people wouldn't think about, like if our servers are not presenting properly, and she always checks our bathrooms she's looking at every detail. She'll tell me, 'This is a little salty or this is too sweet,' especially when I do Persian dishes. I've made her promise to be honest because I'm used to eating her food and that's what I

want to replicate - I want to bring the same flavors when it comes to Persian cuisine."

Hajimaleki's growing success has afforded him the opportunity to begin working on a new concept near and dear to his heart: a Persian restaurant called Roya, scheduled to open sometime in 2021 and currently operating as a pop-up at Eden East farm. "I think the Persian restaurants in Austin do a great job for their market, but the challenge with Persian food is [that] it's foreign. When you go to these big cities, especially on the West Coast, California, there are really great restaurants. I really want to bring this culture to the forefront and showcase it because it's incredible - the food is really good and it's very diverse and I think it will please a lot of different palates.

Hajimaleki envisions Roya differently from many other Iranian restaurants around the country. "When you go to a Persian restaurant and order a meal, vou get this big plate of rice whether you get stew or kabobs, so it's hard to really taste through the menu. It's very heavy, you know, so at Roya, we're going to make that a little bit easier for people. We're not going to be pretentious and have small bites and

tasting menus. I want to present it where people can experience it - it has to be an experience, to come in and taste what we're doing, and see the seasonality in the food and taste it."

Like his other restaurants, seasonal menu flexibility will allow them to support local farms, and the smaller menu adds to a more intimate dining experience. "Atmosphere is

something I think a lot of Persian restaurants lack. There are some [wonderful] cooks that open up restaurants but don't understand that restaurants aren't just about the food - it's about everything you touch, about the atmosphere, the smells, so many different things. It's all your senses.

"I love to support anybody that's doing anything Persian in Austin. The chef that's at Caspian Grill, she's amazing and does a great job, and I definitely make it a point to support [them] because I know what they're doing is important. And it's important to me. They're trying to get people to try this 'new' food. It's not that it's that foreign, but it is, and there's not a large percentage of people who are looking for it."

Hajimaleki did a few Roya pop-ups last year, and plans to host at least one more as they're trying to familiarize local diners


A Beginner's Guide to Persian Food in Austin

ONE OF THE OLDEST GLOBAL CUISINES IS BALANCED. SEASONAL, AND DELICIOUS by Jessi Cape

Persian food is incredibly diverse, with historical implications shaping the cuisine for centuries. American diners tend to lump it in with neighboring fare, but designated Persian food combines flavors of the Far and Middle East with ingredients acquired via the Silk Road (trade routes that run through what is now Iran), bringing in Mediterranean, Indian, Chinese, Greek, Turkish, and Lebanese influences. Persia was the name of the country of Iran before the revolution, and the Persian diaspora often refers to the cuisine as such to acknowledge Iran's different native ethnic groups that contribute to the culinary culture.

Balance is perhaps the most important Persian food philosophy, adhering to the "food is medicine" ethos by working with both gharmi (heat) and sardi (cold) to determine recipes. Herbaceous and sour elements pair with a hearty menu of rice, veggies, and meats (though much is vegetarian), and seasonality is the name of the game, with multi-

layered flavors that enhance everything on the table and a colorful, health-conscious core. The national dish of Iran is chelow kabob, or steamed rice with skewered meat.



Vegetables/fruits: plums, pomegranates, quince, prunes, apricots, raisins, tomatoes, cherries, barberries, eggplant, onions, garlic, radishes, cucumbers

Rice: major staple, often long-grain basmati, served with virtually every dish. Many say that it's traditional in Iran to offer the crust - golden tahdig, or the crispy bottom layer of rice that sticks to the bottom of the pot – to guests, another example of high hospitality in Iranian food culture.

Grains/nuts: also integral; includes whole grains like barley and lentils, plus walnuts, chickpeas, and pistachios

Kabobs: It's pretty widely accepted that kabobs - skewered small chunks of lamb, chicken, fish, beef, usually cooked over flame - originated with ancient Persian soldiers, although dishes such as Turkish doner kabobs, and other iterations, are attributed differently. (With kabob-e barg, the meat is a fillet; in *kubideh*, the meat is ground.)

Torshi: Think pickled veggies, sour cherries, vinegars, dried limes; this is a big deal as it utilizes fruit acids to cut the richness (and animal fats) and aid in digestion.



Yogurt: another critical component, with herbed versions galore. Dried yogurt is called kashk and is used in dishes like eggplant dip. A popular drink, doogh (pronounced "duke"), is a thinned yogurt often mixed with mint, salt, and either sparkling or flat water, and it's great after a heavy meal.

Tea: all day, every day; Iranian tea, such as beloved chai, is brewed with rose petals and served strong with a reddishbrown color, sometimes sweetened with a sugar cube.

Stews/soups: Stews (served with rice) make up a large part of the cuisine. Ghormeh sabzi is very popular with its herbaceous and sour notes (dried Persian limes!) as well as ingredients such as pomegranate molasses, ground walnuts, and chicken. Ash is the Persian word for soup, which is served thinner than stew but thicker than broth.

Dessert: Baked goods feature nuts, rose water, and saffron. Other treats include faloodeh, a cold dish like sherbet, flavored with rose water and topped with vermicelli noodles; nane shirini, a Persian sugar cookie; and almond brittle made with rose water, saffron, and pistachios.

If you're keen to attempt to create these dishes and techniques at home, try one of the cookbooks from acclaimed chef Najmieh Batmanglij, often referred to as the grande dame of Iranian cooking: Cooking in Iran: Regional Recipes and Kitchen Secrets; Joon: Persian Cooking Made Simple; Food of Life: Ancient Persian and Modern Iranian Cooking and Ceremonies; and several others.

And while Roya won't open until 2021, Austin is fortunate to have several other restaurants serving up amazing Persian food. As a bonus, kabobs are pretty popular around town, even when not classic Persian.

CASPIAN GRILL This spot is a wonderland of Persian options with vogurt dips, pickles, flatbreads. lentil soup, traditional kabobs/koobideh/barg, fluffy saffron rice, stews, and specials. They also boast a huge dedicated vegan menu. www.caspiangrillaustin.com.

SHANDEEZ GRILL Serving traditional Persian food since 2005, with a long list of kabobs (all served with basmati and broiled tomatoes), stews (like the ghormeh sabzi), and many Greek dishes to boot, www.shandeez.com.

DAVOD'S MEDITERRANEAN MARKET & GRILL Try their fresh, baked-daily Persian

flatbread (sangak): sourdough flatbread, part whole wheat, baked on stones and topped with sesame seeds. Plus, there's a market for pantry staples. www.fb.com/davodsmarket.

NOORI'S GRILL This small counter-service spot inside Tino's Greek Cafe features Afghan/Persian fare like kabobs and spinach stew. www.imenupro.com/@pcn-1.

WHOLLY KABOB This food truck offers traditional Persian recipes with an Austin flair - from kabob wraps to Persian-style rice bowls - with yogurt sauce, shirazi salad, and house pickles. www.whollykabob.com.

with not only the name, but the cuisine itself. "In a sense, we're testing the market. Is this something the market will support? I think it is. The flavors are very traditional. but they're not presented the same way. We've modernized some things and are using more culinary tech to connect with today's eater. So far the feedback has been better than I expected, honestly."

In addition to Roya, Hajimaleki plans to celebrate his favorite pastime - coastal fishing - with yet another new concept, named for his favorite pier in Port Aransas. "Keepers is a concept for the type of restaurant that I love to go to, especially since living in Louisiana and growing up in Texas. I love fishing and I go to the coast a lot, since I was 15. It's what I do to clear my head. Just drive down and go fishing for a few days."

Melendes and Hajimaleki want Keepers to be approachable, citing that most seafood spots currently in Austin are either very expensive or serving frozen fried foods. "We're trying to do something in the middle. I don't want to make it sound cheap, necessarily, because anytime you get fresh seafood, it's not cheap, but there's a lot of seafood that's not being utilized in the ocean, and we can showcase things like that, as it goes to our belief with sustainability, responsible sourcing, and not just trying to find the cheapest cut of fish to sell."

As with community feedback about Roya, they've been listening to their Circle C patrons, who they say want more familyfriendly, won't-break-the-bank spots with great food - boiled crawfish in season, lighter fare like grilled fish, or a good po'boy. "We want it to be a place where we'd want to go hang out, where people can get away from the hustle-bustle, maybe even feel like they're at the coast."

Keepers Coastal Kitchen is slated to open late spring or early summer 2020 in the former North by Northwest location on Slaughter and MoPac. The space is so large that they've been able to design a unique scenario that allows the brothers to open a second Oasthouse location in the same space. That means two restaurant concepts will operate out of one kitchen, but each will have their own identity, patio, and bar. On the right. Keepers: on the left. Oasthouse.

With all the work, it's a wonder he sleeps at all, but Hajimaleki draws on his family support and his core inspiration: "I'm very passionate and excited about it all, and I love seeing the reason I did this: to have a group of people with a common passion which is food - sit around a table having a great time, not worrying about what's going on in the world. And everybody likes to eat, right?"

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In Production: Addict Named Hal

NEW AUSTIN FEATURE TACKLES REHAB FROM A NEW ANGLE by Richard Whittaker

It's the end of week two of new Austin-made drama Addict Named Hal, and after 10 days shooting interiors in Pflugerville the production has moved closer to home base. The crew - most of whom are current or former Radio-Television-Film students at UT-Austin are shooting at the Friendly Rio Market in West Campus. It's a change of pace. explained writer/director Lane Michael Stanley. There's a chaotic energy to a location shoot, especially in an open store: During one take, the crew realized that a customer was taking photos of the shoot. In Pflugerville, Stanley said, "We were able to set up a production room and a press room, and now we're bouncing around for the rest of the shoot, but it's fun to be here."

Addict Named Hal is a deeply personal project for Stanley, drawing from their own experiences with addiction after the death of their fiancé in 2016. It's also a project that has taken many forms, starting in 2017 as an award-winning short play. In 2018, Stanley adapted that into a short film that screened in Los Angeles and New York as part of the 2019 REEL Recovery Film Festival, and now it's transforming again into a feature film. The shift also reflects Stanley's desire to spread some creative wings. "In theatre," the filmmaker said, "I was both the writer and director, and those are careers that don't mix very well." The appeal of filmmaking is that the creative process is much Find updates about more blended: "I was able Addict Named Hal to have one job expressed and more Austin through text, through design, films in production at through cinematography."

Yet just because film production allows for much more creative engagement, Stanley was determined not to be possessive and self-indulgent. "I'm a big believer that just because something is true doesn't mean it's interesting." When telling a narrative story, "nobody really cares which sections are coming from your life and which aren't. They care about what's an interesting story and a compelling character."

That's part of why the protagonist has changed from Hal (played by Ray Roberts), who is getting off heroin, to Amy (newcomer Natalie L'Amoreaux), a privileged young woman with a drinking problem. L'Amoreaux described herself as "really grateful" to be part of the story. "This is the first major film

> set that I've been on and had such an integral part in it. I feel like I've learned so much in such a short amount of time."

The big task for Director of Photography John

David Devirgiliis (currently in the final year of his MFA at UT) is to capture the whole house and reinforce that this is an ensemble piece through the coverage he's catching. The entire production has been shot handheld, with Devirgiliis as sole camera operator, and only using three lenses. "That's

lean, but it's made us really creative with how we use them, and when we want to go wide and feel the whole group, or when we want to be intimate with somebody."

There's one exception on that youthful crew: industry veteran producer Lowell D. Blank, who started his career as a line producer on Return of the Killer Tomatoes! before moving on to projects like Arnold Schwarzenegger's Collateral Damage and beloved kid-lit adaptation Holes. However, he set Hollywood aside for this smaller film, which he sees as filling an important gap in depictions of addiction, especially with the opioid crisis at its height. He said, "There are a lot of films about parents dealing with kids, and kids dealing with parents, and some crime dramas, but I think there's nothing like this, and Lane's personal experience has a lot to do with it."

LOOKS LIKE one of **Richard Linklater**'s long-gestating film projects is finally nearing ignition. Earlier this month the director sent out a casting call in Austin for young actors for Apollo 10%, his tale of growing up in the shadow of NASA's Johnson Space Center during the Space Race. Back in 2017, the Austin-based filmmaker put out a call for old archival footage and home movies from Houston around that time, and now it looks like the production will shoot this month. Linklater has previously commented that this will be an opportunity to put his birth town of Houston onscreen, as there have been surprisingly few films made about it.

THAT'S NOT THE ONLY PROJECT keeping Linklater busy: He's developing a new docuseries about animal rescues in Austin for streaming service CBS All Access with producer Bill Guttentag (The Last Days of Kennedy and King, Knife Fight). Announcing what is still being called "The Untitled Richard Linklater Project," the director of Slacker and Boyhood said, "What strikes me most is the joy and discovery on both sides of the relationship between the animals and their human caregivers. These are inspirational stories that I believe will be a positive force in the world."

SPEAKING OF LOCAL FILMMAKERS and animals, if you have a **Disney+** subscription make sure to catch the live-action remake of *Lady* and the Tramp, with a script by none other than Austin's own Andrew Bujalski. The reinvention of the classic story of dogs on the run was part of the streaming service's initial lineup. If that sounds out of keeping for the creative force behind seminal mumblecore drama Funny Ha Ha and workplace dramedy Support the Girls, don't forget that another Texan (and we're going to claim him as an honorary Austinite) David Lowery already directed a truly charming new version of Disney's Pete's Dragon and has spent the last couple of years working on a new version of Peter Pan, titled Peter Pan and Wendy, for the House of Mouse.

AUSTIN FILM SOCIETY and Austin Film Festival have both received new grants from the National Endowment for the Arts in the first round of awards for 2020. AFS receives \$25,000 to help with programming costs, while AFF gets \$10,000 to assist in the ongoing archiving and digitizing of the festival's huge On Story archive of interviews with filmmakers. Reacting to the grant, AFF Executive Director Barbara Morgan said, "The content captured at the Festival directly reflects its reputation for being an intimate, instructive, and inspirational experience. We couldn't be more thrilled for this incredible opportunity given by the NEA to help us provide these resources to the general public, free to anyone with an interest in storytelling through film, television, and new media."


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

COLOR OUT OF SPACE

D: Richard Stanley: with Nicolas Cage, Joely Richardson. Madeleine Arthur, Brendan Meyer, Julian Hilliard, Elliot Knight, Tommy Chong. (NR, 111 min.)

"A dream you dream alone is just a dream. A dream vou dream together is reality." failed artist turned alpaca farmer Nathan Gardner (Cage) tells his wife, investment adviser Theresa (Richardson). So also it goes with nightmares, as captured in this disturbing adaptation of H.P. Lovecraft's 1927 novella The Colour Out of Space, about a family destroyed by uncanny forces at the edge of perception in the wake of a meteorite crash.

Dickensian. Shakespearean. Brechtian. Orwellian. Pinteresque. Kafkaesque. There aren't many authors whose names have made the leap to being a term for a whole school of literature, and Lovecraft makes that cut. His name evokes eldritch dread, a sense of powerlessness against things in the dark and the void. In this case, it's the Gardners in their New England home - Nathan, Theresa, their stoner son Benny (Meyer), witchy daughter Lavinia (Arthur, arch and sardonic in a way that only teenagers can be), and youngest boy, Jack (Hilliard). A strange metallic object lands in their yard, and the rules of reality start to collapse in horrifying ways.

Of course, director Richard Stanley sets himself a near-impossible problem. The alien interloper is a color, a wavelength that



The Cost of Lives

Alfre Woodard brings a new perspective to the death penalty in Clemency

Clocks figure quite prominently in Chinonye Chukwu's latest film. Because is not the clock always ticking? Is not time marking our mortality by those hands moving inexorably forward around a circle of numbers, demarcating our lives? And how do you live when you control those lives? Bernadine Williams (Woodard) controls those lives. As a prison warden, she oversees the executions of death row inmates, and the weight of that responsibility hangs heavy, although she hides it quite well behind an implacable facade of composure she is increasingly finding hard to remove.

After an opening sequence of a botched execution that goes harrowingly wrong, Clemency establishes its tone quite quickly, one that mirrors the life of Bernadine. It is one of clipped and workmanlike scenes of her life. It is grim, overseeing the deaths of prisoners. There is one such prisoner, Anthony Woods (Hodge), scheduled for death, who may or may not be a murderer. It is this thread that forms the bulk of the story as forces descend upon him, both good and bad, and those forces have an increasingly haunted affect on Bernadine. As Anthony faces his inexorable fate at the metaphorical gallows, hope becomes something,

clemency becomes something. What makes Chukwu's film so compelling and ultimately all the better for it is the sustained restraint the filmmaker and her team have for veering away from the usual preachy aspects of depicting prison life and death row inmates.

But this is Woodard's show, and her Bernadine is mesmerizing as she navigates her life of meting out justice while grappling with the price of it. It is a very heavy price, and the film, while wrenching, does not stray from its course of showing the ways in which the structure of prison institutions create scars and negate lives at a moment's notice. "I am alone, and no one can fix it," Bernadine says at one point. It's a chilling thought, but one that ultimately rings quite true. The clock ticks on, until it doesn't.

ARBOR

Lovecraft described as "almost impossible to describe." Film being a visual medium, he has to make a choice, and goes for a scintillating purple that steadily seeps into everything, from flowers to minds to the water table - causing it to become an increasing concern for visiting hydrologist Ward Phillips (Knight), who has been charged with preparing for the building of a new reservoir. (It must be noted that there will be a slight amount of glee knowing that Stanley cast a black actor as the outside observer in a story written by the paranoid and notoriously racist Lovecraft.)

It's rare that anything about any movie can be bigger than the mere presence of Cage, the king of mega-acting, but the mere presence of Richard Stanley makes Color Out of Space extraordinary. Making his return to narrative features for the first time since being fired from the catastrophic The Island of Dr. Moreau (a departure recounted in the documentary Lost Soul), his lurid, discordant depiction of the complete collapse of the Gardners is indeed Lovecraftian. What he truly conjures, and what recent stealth Cthulhu mythos tale Underwater so mishandled, is true cosmic dread. Lovecraft

was never about monsters or tentacles, but instead about the constant conviction that nothing in which we place our faith - religion, science, or as with Lavinia, magic - will protect us from an implacable universe that neither knows or cares. What's more, the intrusion is everywhere - from mysterious shapes at the periphery of vision to fruit that grows uncannily fast to warped television signals, scalv skins, fracturing sanity, and a cold disregard for the fragile human form.

For fans of Lovecraft, this may well be the most successful attempt to bring his warped writings to the screen, and is definitely

up there with Stuart Gordon's *Dagon* and *Dreams in the Witch House* – the most loyal conversions to date (it's thrilling news indeed that Stanley gets to do this again with a new take on Lovecraft's *The Dunwich Horror*). But for audiences who don't know the books, this is a bracing, blasphemous horror that pulls you in and twists your nerves.

British filmmaker Guy Ritchie (Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels; Snatch) gangsters up again in this crime comedy where the underworld is a literal one of subterranean farms harvesting illicit weed beneath England's centuries-old manors. Above ground, Oxford-educated American expatriate Mickey Pearson (McConaughey) has decided

to sell his lucrative cannabis empire for \$400 million and enjoy early retirement in the UK with his equally enterprising wife (a very un-Downton Dockery), but the drug deal hits a few snags as the complicated plot zigzags from a fey Jewish American billionaire (Strong) to a coolly brutal Chinese gang lord (Golding) to a no-nonsense boxing coach (Farrell) and his crew of rapping pugilists, all sporting Burberry stripes and plaids tailor-made for an Esquire fashion spread. And yes, there are Russian mobsters making an obligatory appearance to further disrupt any linear narrative.

Ritchie structures much of the script as a pitch for a movie entitled (cue snigger) Bush – what's up with the preoccupation with slang for female genitalia, Guy? - that doubles as a blackmail threat, the pitcher being an opportunistic tabloid journalist (Cockney-accented Grant in delightfully sleazy form) and the pitchee Pearson's dutiful consigliere (Hunnam). As the title intimates, The Gentlemen refines the earmarks of Ritchie's early rough-and-tumble work in its more genteel milieu of tweed jackets and candle-lit dining rooms, but it's less a return to auteur form for the director than a calculated penance for his recent splash in the blockbuster mainstream with Disney's live-action musical Aladdin, where the operative C-words are "cash" and "cow."

In treading the familiar ground of Ritchie's youthful entertainments, the newly released The Gentlemen already feels dated, even anachronous, particularly in these woke times. The crafted patter of verbose dialogue often strains to find a natural rhythm, although there's an occasional gem in the lot, such as the apt utterance: "There's fuckery afoot." The occasional onscreen flashing to translate arcane jargon or perform some other momentary function no longer amuses as it once did. But it's the old-school, prep-school style of homophobia, racism, and anti-Semitism that casually surfaces in that jars the most. Here, one man's touch of another man's thigh is laughably icky; a Vietnamese man's name of "Phuc" is an extended gag; and a Jewish double-crosser's punishment is positively Shylockian. Come to think of it, the villains are gay, Asian, or Jewish, while the heroes are straight, Caucasian, and presumably Protestant (not to mention blond), just like the gentleman who made this film. Movies shouldn't have to meet a PC checklist so they won't offend - who wants that kind of cinema? - but when they poke you in the eye one too many times, it's fair game to poke back.

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THE LAST FULL MEASURE D: Todd Robinson; with Sebastian Stan, Jeremy Irvine, Samuel L. Jackson, William Hurt, Alison Sudol, Ed Harris, Bradley Whitford, Christopher Plummer. (R. 110 min.)

Heroism is often complicated - and sometimes it's very simple. On April 11, 1966, United States Air Force Pararescueman William H. Pitsenbarger flew a helicopter into a firefight and descended into combat to give medical assistance to injured soldiers. Pinned down by enemy fire, with the helicopters incapable of getting anyone else out, Pitsenbarger stayed to tend to and protect the remaining troops. Shot by a Viet Cong sniper in the night, he was found with a rifle in one hand and a medical kit in the other. having saved many American soldiers with both. He was posthumously awarded the Air Force Cross, and 34 years later he was given the Medal of Honor and promoted to Staff Sergeant.

The well-intentioned but disappointingly flat The Last Full Measure tries to describe why Pitsenbarger got the upgrade, and the process that saw the original application for the higher honor getting downgraded. Department of Defense pencil pusher Scott Huffman (Stan) gets pushed from his budget-writing job to overseeing the research into the snub. He travels to visit old soldiers who have a little bit of Pitsenbarger's story to tell, and then the story slips back for scenes from the war. At every step, Huffman's eyes are predictably opened and he too becomes an advocate against this very particular injustice.

It's clearly a passion project for writer/ director Todd Robinson (White Squall). Yet there's an inherent tension between the veracity of what happened on the ground on that bloody day and the highly fictionalized depiction of a by-the-numbers low-key cover-

up by a disinterested Pentagon (please, someone give Bradley Whitford something other to do than "fast-talking officious bureaucrat"). Stan does his best with a very two-dimensional (and that's generous) part as the fictitious administrator on a mission, and there was always going to be something worthwhile in watching a series of aging character actors - Jackson, Hurt, and most especially the late Peter Fonda as a PTSD-riddled night bird - playing a different cliche of the Vietnam veteran. Yet there's also something very questionable about peddling discredited myths about returning veterans being spat on by hippies at public airports. Plus, at this point, having every Vietnamese character be a bloodthirsty butcher with no lines reinforces that this feels more like a 1980s TV movie than a considered tribute to a fallen hero - especially when Pitsenbarger himself feels so lightly sketched. What could have been a worthy tribute becomes a by-thenumbers melodrama.

APOLLO 11

D: Todd Douglas Miller. (G, 93 min.)

It will be 50 years ago this summer that Americans first walked on the moon, and this feature-length documentary takes us inside the event with footage that's never before been seen or heard. It's a celebratory movie designed to rekindle awe for the accomplishments of the NASA astronauts and ground scientists, as well as a reminder of what can be achievable when a country and its politicians work in unison toward a shared goal. Director Todd Douglas Miller (Dinosaur 13) painstakingly assembled Apollo 11 from a trove of newly discovered 65mm footage and 11,000 hours of uncatalogued audio recordings. NASA cinematographers filmed everything, not only the Mission Control scientists, but also the mechanical workers prepping the launchpad platforms and catwalks, and the crowds that assembled on the nearby beaches and parking lots. This constructs a sense that this was a community's effort, rather than the just the heroic actions of three brave astronauts: Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin, and Michael Collins. A BEAUTIFUL DAY IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

A movie about a children's entertainer is not necessarily a film for children. A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood may be about Fred Rogers, the creator of Mister Rogers' Neighborhood and epitome of kindness for generations of American children, but it's a mature and poignant character study - albeit one with puppets. Based loosely on Tom Junod's highly lauded 1998 profile of Rogers for Esquire, the script makes Rogers the supporting character, explaining him by what he meant to others: In this case, burned-out journalist Lloyd Vogel (Rhys), still carrying trauma from his broken relationship with his father. By changing that focus, A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood brings that essential essence of Fred Rogers to life, and reminds us by his example how important it is to like people just the way they are. However, even though the character's physical attributes are impeccable, Kelly's toxic ideologies (i.e., Santa Claus is a white man) are underplayed. She's one of three women at the heart of Bombshell's story. Gretchen Carlson (Kidman) is really the first anchor to lower the boom on Ailes (played with loathsome sexism and ample padding by Lithgow), while Robbie plays a naive yet ambitious fictional "evangelical millennial" who we observe being sexually humiliated by Ailes. Yet even with these performances, Bombshell lands more like a spectacular bottle rocket than a scorching Molotov cocktail. (12/20/2019) ***

Focusing on the ways in which various fungi are a vital part of the cycle of life, the film inevitably cranks up CCR's "Fortunate Son" and begins its trek through the psilocybin aspects of fungi for recreational and therapeutic effect. But visual affectations aside (I haven't even mentioned the inordinate but predictable use of kaleidoscopes), Fantastic Fungi is an engaging look at the scope of an organism that is so much more than a pizza topping. What makes The Farewell one of the best movies of the year is the way she surfaces these differences, and how Billi's path to acceptance of them makes The Farewell one of the most heartfelt homecoming films in years. While the movie has its share of racetrack thrills, it's the personal and professional friendship between Shelby and Miles that gives the movie traction. 

O JOJO RABBIT

With the real world in literal flames, Taika Waititi's newest sounds like treacherous territory for the *Thor: Ragnorok* director. In Nazi Germany circa 1944, meek but fervently pro-Nazi Jojo (the excellent, cherubic Davis) lives alone with his mother Rosie (Johansson), a vibrant and vital force in a household lacking a father figure – a gap he fills with his imaginary friend, Hitler (Waititi as a slapstick führer). Jojo and his imaginary ideologue are naturally aghast to discover that mom's hiding a young Jewish girl, Elsa (McKenzie), in the walls upstairs. But that



discovery and the tentative steps toward mutual semi-understanding kindle the undoing of both Jojo's corrupted kidhood worldview and his goofy, goonish imaginary Hitler. This is a coming-of-age story unlike any other, filled with the director's trademark heart and a soul-stirring argument against the ever ready darkness of unswerving "patriotic" nationalism. 

There's little that hasn't been seen before in legal procedurals, yet Just Mercy scores as an emotionally



It's up to Benoit Blanc (Craig), the dapper, Dixie-drawling sleuth private eye with the name of a cheap Chardonnay, and enchanting de Armas' Marta, the dead man's naive caretaker whose regurgitative reaction to untruthfulness is an amusing parasympathetic response central to the movie's plotline, to find the killer. They are the most rounded characters, but when the worm turns and the movie's ensemble of disinherited progeny indignantly clamor after learning the gravy train has derailed, the collective avarice displayed by the secondary cast of characters is almost giddy. If you don't know Little Women, you might get a little lost with writer/director Greta Gerwig's plotting. Instead of relating in a linear fashion the tale of the four March girls of Concord, Mass. - pretty and practical Meg (Watson), headstrong Jo, saintly Beth (Scanlen), and brattish baby of the family Amy (Pugh) - Gerwig opens the action in New York, where adult Jo has gone to become a writer, and then rewinds to different chapters. It's a thoroughly loyal yet modern adaptation, especially in its physicality: Shoulder shrugs, head cocks, and eye rolls are all part of the arsenal of these Civil War-era teens, and the March girls are forever in a state of pummeling each other. They have only their feet to carry them across this blasted, muddy landscape, Basing the story on family history, Mendes' terrifying view of conflict is poetic and tragic, dreamlike without the forced stoner surrealism that too often afflicts war dramas. It is instead impressionistic, most especially in its highly structured cinematography by Roger Deakins . A story of good men trying to prevent a dangerous attack made by ill-informed leaders, based on bad information and bloody intentions? This is no period piece, but a warning. (01/10/2020)

from afar. "Self-Righteous, Smug and Wicked"

Onur Tukel isn't pulling any punches. In the results of the 2016 election, he said. "We got the president we deserved."

That's the core of the writer/director's 2017 film The Misogynists, which screens at AFS Cinema as part of the 10th anniversary celebration of Brooklyn's

Factory 25 distribution house. On the surface, it's an unflattering portrait of Tukel's favorite subject: weak men. A couple of New York businessmen. Baxter (Lou Jay Taylor) and Cameron (a firingon-all-cylinders **Dylan**

Baker) check in to a

Manhattan hotel on election night, 2016, to celebrate "their" victory. It's a night when they feel they can cut loose, because the patriarchy has won, so it's coke, booze, slurs, and prostitutes all-round. For Tukel, spending the night with them is like staring the Trump phenomenon square in the face. "It's like someone with acrophobia who sky-dives to conquer their fear. I wanted to face him so I could stop being afraid."

But vile as the duo are. Tukel isn't exactly lenient with the people with whom they cross paths. Tukel said, "One of my producers was at a picnic last year. A friend of his walked up to him and said, 'I'm sorry, but you're not allowed to make a film called The

> Misogynists, not today, not tomorrow. Not ever.' What a presumptuous thing to tell someone, like they're in middle school. But we are allowed to do that, of course, and that's exactly what we did. But the movie at its core isn't about misogyny at all. It's about language."

Moreover, The Misogynists may be set against the election of Trump, but Tukel suggests that it could take place during any election in which friends find themselves at odds. What makes it contemporary is the modern wave of neo-puritanism that led to that picnic confrontation. "It's a reaction to this 'watch what you say' culture. I find it all very off-putting. It just makes me want to revolt against the people setting the rules."



The script was written in a blur, the first draft completed in about a week after election day, but that's part of its immediacy and potentially its longevity. "I'm looking forward to see how this movie plays three or 10 vears from now." Tukel said. "I think it captures the spirit of the times. There seems to be a general lack of self-awareness in the culture today. Hypocrisy pervades everything." Take a key scene in which one of Cameron's hotel room neighbors bangs on his door and screams at him for being loud. "I used to feel like she was being heroic, the marginalized female standing up to the tyrannically corporate bully. But I don't know anymore. Is bullying another bully an act of heroism? Is

screaming at someone so loudly that they can't even respond exceptional behavior?"

It's one of multiple gasp-out-loud moments of confrontation but, Tukel said, "My goal was not to shock. The goal was to hold up a mirror up to all Americans, to show the ugly side, the hypocrisy. I wanted to out all of us as selfrighteous, smug and wicked." Yet it still provides something like an off-ramp for those that voted for Trump in 2016 and now have buyer's remorse. Tukel said, "I learned to appreciate the lunatics who voted for him to shake up the system. It was kind of brave. But then again, maybe some of them woke up and thought, 'Oh no. What have I done?' Like someone who wakes up from a bad night of drinking."

Demons & Delights: | The Art of Billie Buck

On a rainy weeknight, **Billie Buck** is behind the counter at **Antone's Record Shop**. Enter a stonery young guy clutching an unwrapped **King Gizzard & the Lizard Wizard** LP. He complains of "grass" in the packaging, which turns out to just be bits of paper edges caught in the fresh-from-the-factory static.

Under Buck's firm but polite questioning, the customer accidentally spits out the true source of this "grass" complaint: He wanted a different edition of the album. Buck kindly sends him to browse merchandise for an exchange. In my mind's eye, the lanky shopper has just been plucked up by one of her long-legged, devil-tailed female illustrations.

Buck's cartoon characters, an established visual presence among the local gig poster scene, might seem demonic if they weren't having so much fun. The striking, sinister, and playful world of their creator convenes for her first-ever exhibit, "Hot Soup," at the **Austin Museum of Popular Culture**. The show kicks off Sunday, 2-6pm, with music by Antone's Record Shop co-owner **Eve**

Monsees, and continues Thu.-Sun., 1-6pm, through March 29.

"I had this older male client who wanted an advertisement for his new amplifier, so I drew this really strong woman with huge muscles," recalls Buck, explaining a story she shared while accepting her second **Austin Music Award** for Best Poster Artist last year. "I get a call from him saying, 'Well, Billie, honestly I'm a little traumatized by the way you drew that lady.' I was like, 'Perfect, this is a good thing.'"

The 26-year-old boasts plenty of self-portrait snaps in guitar-playing and motorcycle-riding positions, acting as her own body model for rock & roll iconography. In striped pants and pointy boots, she's clearly an influence on the black-haired figure she drew for this year's AMA poster. Promo for her punk band **Sailor Poon** unleashes her wildest concepts, like a Thanksgiving turkey with six boobs.

The Austin native blames her father, esteemed local blues drummer/Antone's

Records co-owner/
Monsees spouse **Mike Buck**, for her lack of inhibitions across artistic mediums. She grew up watching go-go dancers at his shows, encouraged to pursue arts above music. Meanwhile, the young Buck also absorbed **Felix the Cat** and **Betty Boop** cartoons.

"Growing up, I was always surrounded by images of performing, performative women," adds the frontwoman. "Sometimes I'll be like, 'Dad, I'm going to do a

roller-skating, saxophone-playing strip tease.' He'll be like, 'Oh, we did that in 1984.'"

Buck studied art at the **University of North Texas**, got kicked out for smoking pot, and wrapped things up at **Texas Woman's University**. While in Denton, she mixed art and music by painting psychedelic murals inside hardcore DIY venue/eatery **Taqueria EI Picante**. When she moved home to intern for **Transmission Events**, she designed fliers for the likes of **Melvins** and **Swans**. The

exhibit includes a never-seen **Ty Segall** poster, rejected by artist management for depicting a woman on a swing with her skirt blowing up.

Alongside her commissioned work for venues across town, Buck designs regularly for **Hotel Vegas** and her family's record store. She also heads up sale of vintage post-

ers at the shop, having gleaned a wealth of inspiration from local **Armadillo World Headquarters**-era poster artists. Buck spent hours studying the detailed scales on **Jim Franklin**'s iconic armadillo illos.

She features the locally beloved critter on the "Hot Soup" exhibition poster, a Day-Glo, horn-adorned rendition of **Hieronymus Bosch**'s *The Garden of Earthly Delights*. **Leea Mechling**, executive director of the museum, is excited to print out some of Buck's designs for the first time, many having only lived digitally in the social-media era of concert promotions.

"We want to show people the younger group really carrying Austin culture forward, and Billie is just the perfect example," explains Mechling. "She's absorbed what's around her, but has made her own style that's a little impertinent."

"To put this together, I had to go back through my entire career and have a small existential crisis along the way," explains Buck. "So, I thought 'Hot Soup' was putting all that into a big pot and serving it up."

The New AusPop

On Oct. 27, the Austin Museum of Popular Culture opened up its new location at 6416 North Lamar for inaugural exhibit "The Ballad of Jim Franklin: Old, New, and Weird." While hopping across the river to the building behind Threadgill's Old No. 1, the former South Austin Museum of Popular Culture modified its name. It's an appropriate evolution considering the 16-year-old nonprofit rounds up all walks of music-related local art from 1955 on.

Executive Director **Leea Mechling** now finishes moving over 10,000 archival tickets, T-shirts, backstage passes, photos, and more from its previous location at the Planet K building on South Lamar, but the collection still focuses on posters.

"Back when all of us who formed the museum were in our early 20s, we were really struck by show posters," explains Mechling, who worked at the **Armadillo World Headquarters**. "It was not considered art; it was advertisement. But when you accumulate a body of work, it really becomes more than that."

When the museum's pro bono agreement with their former landlord ended, Threadgill's owner **Eddie Wilson** donated his back building. An industrial kitchen space now holds a hodgepodge of Austin ephemera, with the main exhibition room offering more space. Mechling plans to launch a website and digital archive soon and is looking for volunteers with experience in archival work and social media.

"We have more than we can say grace over, which is a happy problem," she adds.



Gypsy Tricks

The Austin Punk Chronicles, chapter two, part two: Glitter rock (1972-76) fades

Grown men playing with adult weapons and sophistication galvanized Franklin's Mast's young black singer/drummer Bevis

Born in Los Angeles, 1953, he'd witnessed R&B become rock & roll at age 5 as genre giants like Ike Turner and Bobby "Blue" Bland frequented his father's barbershop next door to the 5-4 Ballroom, a prime venue on the Chitlin' Circuit. Entering teenhood as the Beatles and Stones upended the musical universe, he observed South Central denizens groovin' to "Day Tripper," and Arthur Lee and Johnny Echols grabbing a piece of the action in Love. Then he got sent to Wichita Falls to keep out of trouble.

It found him nonetheless.

Griffin's antics, like taking his shirt off in class to beat the heat, caught the attention of budding guitarist Jimmy Lee Saurage, a half-Korean result of a wartime union, adopted by a self-described "Arkansas hillbilly" Air Force family. After high school, the two played James Gang and Grand Funk Railroad numbers at area service clubs and teen canteens as Franklin's Mast with bassist Barry Minnick. The name derived from a pair of store names spliced

together by Saurage "because it sounded like Led Zeppelin."

Among the bands they encountered on this circuit, Krackerjack prompted Griffin in November 1971 to follow them to Austin, where Saurage met up with him the next year to reform Franklin's Mast with bassist Jimmy

"Barry left due to social anxiety caused by our wild, lewd, and lascivious lifestyle," guffaws Griffin.

At this point, the bandleader aimed the group in a new direction.

"Bevis listened to a lot of black music," Saurage recalls, "but he wanted to be a glam rock star. He was way into David Bowie, the New York Dolls, all that. He was way more sophisticated than me in music and fashion."

"My glam style was inspired by Hendrix, Sly Stone, Small Faces, T. Rex, Bowie, Slade," muses Griffin now. "I loved Alice Cooper. He really got under people's skins. Iggy [Pop] was the most nihilistic thing you

could put on the cover of a magazine. I'm absorbing and assimilating all this, and I'm doing it as a drummer that sings.

"But I was frustrated, because I could never find front guys. Even Jimmy Saurage, as extroverted as he was. I constantly had my foot up his ass: 'Ya gotta do more! Slit your wrists - something! We need to explode some shit!""

Franklin's Mast already cut a profile. Even in glam, where outré was in, mixed-race combos were rare. Meanwhile, Griffin strutted around Austin in an Afro that would've given the Ohio Players' Sugarfoot Bonner pause.

"Those days were mad dangerous," he laughs. "I would get accosted on the street. I had to carry nunchucks! I had a man bag full of weapons! And I was asking for it. A Clockwork Orange was a huge influence on my young mind, and I literally became a droog."

Any Texas glitter critter took their life in their hands. Social mores about sexuality, fashion, and gender roles found their match in rock & roll. A state of cow town origins didn't take this peaceably.

"Good way to get beat up," laughs

first-generation ATX punk Eddie Munoz. "These closeted cowboys didn't know whether to fight you or fuck you."

"Franklin's Mast were booked by the Hatchett Booking Agency, who handled all the Texas glam acts and cover bands," recalls Saurage. "We would get booked into Midland, Odessa, Killeen,

Abilene – real redneck places. We'd show up dressed in pink pants and some kinda beige satin shirt tied in front like a girl. We would attract all these girls who thought we were on the cutting edge.

"But we had our detractors - rednecks, girls and guys too - who would form opposing camps in the audience.

"I remember in Odessa," he laughs. "This kid came up to us at the break and said, 'Hey, there's gonna be a rumble after y'all's show! The guys that hate you are gonna try to attack you as you leave the club. But don't worry, I've got my chainsaw underneath your van!""

Even within the glam community, confusion surfaced. Saurage recalls the Werewolves' Seab Meador - no stranger to gender-bending fashion – eyeballing him at a party and announcing, "Y'know, I wouldn't know what to do with a dick." On another occasion, post-gig, the Franklin's Mast guitarist drove the band's equipment home after swallowing a quaalude someone handed him. Pulled over by the police when he barfed out the car window, he quickly changed seats with a roadie.

"The cop took one look at us and said, 'Y'all are dressed like you're from Mars! That's it, I'm gonna hafta take you into the station. The guys are not gonna believe me unless I show them!""

"The hippies thought we were from another planet," snorts Krackerjack guitarist Gary Myrick. "We played Mother Earth once and as I walked out, some guy said, 'Let the queers through.' I looked at him and put my guitar case down. I'd had it. I'm not a violent guy, but I slugged him bigtime. We had a roadie named Cutter Brandenburg, who ended up working for Stevie Ray [Vaughan] for many years, and he was my super-bro. He pushed me out of the way and beat the fuck outta that guy!

"We were glam punks. We didn't give a fuck. We were ready to throw down with anyone we had to."

Thanks to steady gigs on Charlie Hatchett's statewide network (see "The Hatchett Man," Sept. 30, 2011), Krackerjack lived like rajahs on the mid-Seventies dollar. Their \$1,000-per-night guarantees meant they shared a fourplex and enjoyed plenty of leftover scratch for new Les Pauls, Marlboros, fifths of Jim Beam, little baggies of this 'n' that, and spending sprees in thrift store women's departments, according to initial bassist Tommy Shannon.

"We never had money," counters Griffin. "There were places where you could get five hamburgers for \$8. As long as it didn't bite back, quality didn't matter. And we were motorheads, so we really

didn't eat that much!"

Echoing Shannon, he recounts salvaging runs at thrifts across East and West Texas, as well as on the decaying department stores and notions shops of Sixth Street, where

they searched for lace, sequins, and any sort of detail to sew onto antique shirts and repurposed Dickies.

"We used to do some horrendous patchwork that turned out really beautiful," Griffin recounts. "I also had a 20-inch waist for a long time, so I could wear any girl's clothing. First thing you do when you start dating a girl is go through her closet!"



SHAPES OF THINGS

In Never the Same Again, Jesse Sublett recalls having to resort to "gypsy tricks" once Jelly Roll commenced.

"We got by on free cover charges, \$300 cars, couch crashing, and the kindness of women who loved rock & roll enough to put

> up with the men who made it," he wrote. "Friendly waitresses lost our tickets or looked the other way when we walked the tab. Being a musician was a life of crime. Every dollar we scammed was

better than \$10 or \$20 in a paycheck from a day job."

Likely Austin's final glam act, Jelly Roll proved the bridge to the city's punk future.

Bassist Sublett escaped Johnson City ennui via Sixties garage-punk and the Stones/Yardbirds R&B that inspired it. Also lured to Austin by Krackerjack, he and girlfriend Dianne Roberts abandoned the few semesters they'd matriculated at Texas State in San Marcos for his rock & roll dreams. Guitarist Munoz blew out of his native San Antonio for Austin in 1973 at 17, armed with his own three-chord dreams and a knack for lacerating riffs. He'd been gigging, first with Silver Clouds, then in Warp Factor 5 with guitarist/girlfriend Carla Olson.

A willowy blonde who Sublett describes in Never the Same Again as a "better-looking, more streetwise Joni Mitchell," Olson still speaks in elasticated Texas vowels despite living in L.A. since 1978. A decade earlier, she and future Blieb Alien autoharpist Billy Miller got together as a teenage recording duo at roughly the time she attended Holy Cross School in her native Austin with Eric Johnson and Jay Podolak.

"I met Jesse at the same time as Eddie." she recalls of a fateful 1976 evening. "We walked into Mother Earth, and there was a guy with a red bandanna wrapped around his head like a pirate. He was sitting at the first table as you walked into the club. Eddie looked at Jesse, Jesse looked at him, and they just immediately bonded.

"The feeling was so mutual between them, they had to start a band. Jelly Roll did Stones and Yardbirds stuff. They didn't write originals. They played the Too Bitter in San Marcos and the Oasis on Ben White and South First. They did three or four 45-minute sets a night, blues rock like everyone else."

Reanimating a dormant outfit formed by singer Danny Coulson, this incarnation of Jelly Roll also featured original lead guitarist Robin Detlefson and drummer Ronn Dixon. Whatever chemistry they shared, however, proved short-lived.

Munoz and Sublett played San Antonio on August 15, 1976, backing a local singer named Queen Bee. While they were gone, a shifty ex-roommate of Roberts and Sublett stopped by with a creepy friend who'd been forbidden from coming to the house, Lyle Richard Brummett. Roberts expressed her dislike of the latter, who returned later that night and let himself in through a window. Sublett discovered Roberts' body the next

day when he returned home.

"That was a tough moment for him, obviously," says Olson. "The band still played a few gigs after that, but Jesse needed to stop and take a break."

As went Jelly Roll, so too did Austin/Texas glam escape documentation. Both Myrick, who eventually played in a Krackerjack featuring no original members in its final days, and Shannon claim River City's prime movers never recorded studio demos, although live tapes may exist.

"No one was going to sign us," scoffs Myrick. "You had to live in L.A. or New York to get signed. Major-label talent scouts weren't coming to Austin."

Myrick eventually moved to L.A., achieving New Wave stardom in the early Eighties with minor hit "She Talks in Stereo" and opening for the Kinks in a band with Sex Pistols guitarist Steve Jones before teaming with Clash bassist Paul Simonon in Havana 3am. Shannon famously joined short-lived Krackerjack guitarist Stevie Ray Vaughan's Double Trouble. That left the Werewolves as the sole Texas glam band to reach the brass ring (see "Glitter Rock," Jan. 17).

Unfortunately, by the time Rolling Stones Svengali Andrew Loog Oldham discovered the Dallas combo, lured them to NYC, and inked an RCA deal, his production chops had been decimated by years of debauchery. The Werewolves' two 1978 LPs sounded more like limp Southern boogie than the roaring hard-rock-in-Max-Factor that scared the New York Dolls. Criminally underserved, Meador died of a brain tumor on January 24, 1980.

HOLIDAYS IN THE SUN

Mother Earth's North Lamar location burned down in late 1976. It then moved to East Riverside, in the space that eventually became the Back Room and later redeveloped into the second coming of Emo's. Olson returned from a 1977 England trip seeing her friend Toni Laumer, then involved with Jake Riviera, a colorful London music business character who'd begun a label with his partner Dave Robinson: Stiff Records.

Olson got a unique view of what was brewing across the Atlantic. Returning home, she found Munoz attempting to rouse a still-grieving Sublett. Munoz was boarding with an English woman and her teenage daughter, a guitarist who returned from her own British sojourn with a head full of ideas inspired by witnessing the ruckus raised by the Sex Pistols and other guttersnipes.

"I decided in England," says Kathy Valentine with clear-eyed certainty, "that I would go back to Austin and start the city's first punk band."

Drums & Tuba, Brown Whörnet album release



Now a part-time proposition, Drums & Tuba hybrids guitar pop, freak funk, and avant-garde minimalism in its hometown only once in a blue moon. The sky thus acquires an azure hue Saturday, when tubist Brian Wolff and drummer Tony Nozero make a rare appearance atop a bill of local outsiders.

"Tony and I started playing again a few years ago off and on," emails Wolff. "I'd been playing on my own as either a solo act or with different drummer friends of mine under the title Wolff & Tuba, but there's something truly unique about Tony's drumming. I missed

"When I finally convinced him to do a show, he pretty much ruined me for playing with other people."

Nozero also contributed to 2018's Triumph!, originally intended as a Wolff & Tuba LP.

"Ropeadope Records wanted to put it out as a Drums & Tuba record, which I agreed to, but I'm sure they regret that," writes Wolff. "I'm excited to dig in at some point and make a full-on recording with Tony in the not-too-distant future."

In the meantime, the brass half of the band revels in being back onstage with his pals in Brown Whörnet and the Ron Titter Band.

"Time has only made me appreciate more the magic of old friends and music, and the importance of appreciating each show and moment to the fullest," offers the full-time nursing student. "I remember back in the day how critical we'd be after every show. Now I appreciate that it's less about achieving perfection and more about sharing and enjoying the experience with people we know and love."
