THE WAR ON DRUGS GOT IT WRONG: No one is disposable

When I was arrested for my first drug offense, I was 19 years old. The War on Drugs told elected officials that Black people like me were the villains of the story and needed to be locked away in the name of public safety. Along with millions across the country, I was deemed disposable. For the next 20 years, I couldn't find a job or find a place to live in, and I panicked every time I was pulled over for fear that once again that disposable label would be placed on my forehead.

Today I celebrate my life as a partner, parent, son, brother, colleague, and friend in successful recovery from substance use disorder and mental illness. I do not owe my recovery to the criminal justice system; locking me in a cage harmed me and drove me further away from wellness. My recovery was made possible thanks to an amazing support network of friends and family dedicated to my best interests.

As a formerly incarcerated Black man with behavioral health diagnoses, my success is a statistical anomaly – but it doesn't have to be. When we stop investing in systems of policing and punishment, we make space to create alternatives that promote wellness and healing for everyone.

Earlier this month, Grassroots Leadership, Texas Criminal Justice Coalition, Texas Harm Reduction Alliance, and the UT Law Civil Rights Clinic released a preliminary key findings report. The report finds that - in a city that systematically pushes Black people out of Austin and dwindled the population to just over 9% - Black people constitute over a third of all drug arrests. Half of the arrests resulted from minor traffic stops like driving with an expired registration or failure to signal. Half of possession of controlled substance cases directly related to medical or mental health crises, resulting in jail time of up to two years, delaying or denying the immediate need to respond to medical and mental health needs.

The report found that minor traffic violations account for half of the arrests analyzed in the report. Digging deeper,

we found that the areas containing the largest clusters of drug possession arrests are Rundberg, East Riverside, and East William Cannon – neighborhoods where Black and Latinx communities predominantly live.

The path to recovery is different for everyone, but we must ensure that resources and tools are in place so that wellness is equally available to anyone who chooses it. We need to build upon current efforts, such as the Sobering Center and the recent elimination of arrests for low-level cannabis possession, and expand our investment in person-centered, community-driven approaches to address the prevalence of behavioral health issues within Travis County and prevent harms like overdose and death. Instead of arrest and incarceration, which are costly and disruptive to our families and communities, local policymakers must provide avenues for care for those who

need them and remove all barriers to housing and employment for justice-involved people.

If we want to live in a city that is healthy and thriving, we must provide resources and care to all of our communities. People shouldn't be punished for needing help – that's why

we must enact a Good Samaritan policy so people who call 911 for an overdose are not arrested and punished; studies show states with Good Samaritan laws experienced a 15% decrease in overall opioid deaths. Similarly, we must adopt a hospital-based deflection program that eliminates the threat of arrest for people admitted due to overdose and instead connects them with support services. Most importantly, we must divorce ourselves from this racist drug war once and for all.

Every step forward on my path reaffirms that the way this system is currently built leaves no room for interest in my recovery and transformation. We must push ourselves to be creative and imagine a community that radically practices the act of compassion and care for everyone. It's time for us to do better. It is time for us to tell our elected officials that the War on Drugs got it wrong: No one is disposable.



U.S. PRESIDENT: ELIZABETH WARREN

The Chronicle endorsed Bernie Sanders in the 2016 Democratic presidential primary, and the Vermont senator has done nothing since to either make us regret that endorsement or make us uncomfortable with the thought of him prevailing this time. But we have quite a few more choices than we did four years ago, so we looked for a candidate that we might like even better than Bernie, and we found one.

Now is the time to make a stand for the progressive values this paper has championed since its founding, to break down barriers and shift the paradigms of the federal government, and to eradicate the political and moral pestilence of which Donald Trump is but a symptom. But it is also time to connect the dots and bring together the diverse American peoples to collectively form a majority that's strong enough to trample Trumpism here and now - not in the nation of tomorrow, or of yesterday, or of our dreams.

This is where we think the senator from Massachusetts has an edge over Sanders. Warren's messages, her experiences, her insights, and yes, her plans all suggest to us that she has the best chance of using the next four or eight years to accomplish real change, to hold the miscreants of the current regime accountable, and to leave the country better off than where we started. Plus, she has the support of Julián Castro, who might very well have earned our endorsement were he still in the race.

U.S. CONGRESS

U.S. SENATOR: CRISTINA TZINTZÚN RAMIREZ

A dozen Democrats (of various bona fides) have filed for the nomination to challenge incumbent John Cornyn. Veteran MJ Hegar, state Sen. Royce West, and Latina organizer Tzintzún Ramirez embody the best chances to upset the deep-pocketed Cornyn, and thereby change the state and national political posture of Texas. We admire Hegar's visible energy and her tireless campaign against Cornyn's complacent fealty to GOP priorities, and West has a stellar record as a defender of human rights and supporter of education, engaging the whole range of progressive causes. But as a youthful founder of both the Workers Defense Project and Jolt Action, Tzintzún Ramirez has demonstrated statewide leadership and activism, and sophistication about the specific challenges facing Texas residents: In health care, immigration, criminal justice reform, labor rights, and climate change, she's consistently been on the front lines as organizer, advocate, and activist. Each of these candidates would bring special abilities to the 2020 statewide campaign - we believe Tzintzún Ramirez speaks for the newest generation in Texas politics, and we urge voters to join and amplify her voice.

U.S. REP. DISTRICT 10: MIKE SIEGEL

We endorsed Siegel in 2018, when he ran a DIY grassroots campaign that made competitive a GOP-drawn district written off by the national Democratic Party and the pundits. We see no reason to change our minds this time around. Siegel does face stronger primary opposition from qualified newcomers, civil attorney

Shannon Hutcheson and primarv care doctor Pritesh Gandhi. We were especially impressed by Gandhi's engaged eloquence, and each would mean dramatically improved representation and policies over entrenched GOP incumbent Michael McCaul. Siegel has earned our primary support.

U.S. REP. DISTRICT 17: RICK KENNEDY

Software engineer Kennedy has soldiered on in this difficult, 12-county district for two cycles and is savvy about what it will take to defeat whoever survives the newly competitive GOP primary (incumbent Bill Flores is retiring). He has two nominal opponents (David Jaramillo and William Foster III). We recommend Kennedy.

U.S. REP. DISTRICT 21: WENDY DAVIS

This seat nearly flipped blue in 2018, and it seems likelier to do so in 2020. Jennie Lou Leeder is an honorable, qualified Dem candidate, but Davis' official experience and (frankly) star power should be devastating in a general campaign against Chip "Sourpuss" Roy. Vote for Wendy.

U.S. REP. DISTRICT 25: JULIE OLIVER

Democrats will choose between two qualified and very hardworking candidates in farmer/organizer Heidi Sloan and attorney/health care consultant Oliver, who can finish each other's sentences on progressive issues. In this San Marcos to Ft. Worth gerrymander, Sloan has anchored her campaign by Central Texas canvassing, with some out-county forays; Oliver has relentlessly worked the entire 13-county district since her 2018 run. A close primary is likely - in a general campaign to take on moneyed incumbent Roger Williams, Oliver's experience and strategy represent the better chance of success, and she is our choice.

U.S. REP. DISTRICT 31: CHRISTINE EADY MANN

Family practitioner Eady Mann ran a solid second to now-Senate candidate MJ Hegar in 2018, and that race put a scare into feckless GOP incumbent John Carter. Of the four other contenders (Eric Hanke, Donna Imam, Dan Janjigian, Tammy Young), only businesswoman Imam has thus far reflected the resources to contend in a crowded race that portends a run-off. The differences on progressive Democratic issues are marginal, but Eady Mann's field team experience provides an edge on all the others. Pending March 3 ... we recommend Eady Mann.

U.S. REP. DISTRICT 35: LLOYD DOGGETT

We endorse only in contested races, so the token presence of San Antonian businessman (and nice guy) Rafael Alcoser III provides a welcome opportunity to enthusiastically recommend lifelong Democratic standardbearer Doggett. Let's get him some help!

STATE GOVERNMENT

RAILROAD COMMISSIONER: CHRYSTA CASTAÑEDA

Manv Democrats would be worthy opponents to GOP incumbent Rvan Sitton, but Castañeda earns our endorsement because of her realworld experience in the energy industry, which will help her go toe-to-toe with the current commissioners and the RRC bureaucracy that's for years been totally captive to the power of that same industry. Kelly Stone doesn't have a sufficient résumé for this post now, but she is the most vocal champion in this primary for sustainability, climate action, and a Green New Deal, all of which will inevitably conspire in the future to put the RRC as it exists today out of business.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION. **DISTRICT 5: REBECCA BELL-METEREAU**

While Rebecca Bell-Metereau, a school district volunteer and Texas State University professor of more than three decades. sought the District 5 seat in 2010, 2012, and 2016 against right-wing Republican Ken Mercer, this time she has a much stronger shot. With ideologue Mercer stepping down after 14 years, Bell-Metereau - whose margin of defeat hovered below only 5% in 2016 among 13 counties – could conceivably flip the long-held conservative seat. We applaud newcomer Letti Bresnahan's passion for education and respect her experience as an ISD school board member; however, we'd like to see a Bell-Metereau win after all these years.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION. **DISTRICT 10:** MARSHA BURNETT-WEBSTER

A now-retired school administrator and teacher of more than 25 years with a doctorate in education. Marsha Burnett-Webster's background, combined with her compassion for students and dedication to education, will serve well on the SBOE, whose members and designated experts - at least historically - have been known to lack actual educational experience. Growing up amid segregated schools, Burnett-Webster's attention to inclusivity and racial and cultural histories will also aid the board as they develop curriculum.

STATE JUDICIAL

Supreme Court CHIEF JUSTICE: AMY CLARK MEACHUM PLACE 6: KATHY CHENG PLACE 7: BRANDY VOSS PLACE 8: GISELA TRIANA

Although it remains an uphill fight, Texas politics are changing, and the 2020 election represents the possibility of real change in the judiciary, with a return to desperately needed legal and political balance. In the Democratic primary, we are supporting candidates both distinguished in record and holding the best chances of November success. District Judge Clark Meachum is an impartial, powerhouse judge who presides over all the Travis County civil and family courts (and her primary opponent is a vainglorious party-jumper); litigator Cheng is both highly qualified and a hardworking campaigner running to broaden the court's perspectives and its demographic diversity; Voss is an appellate law expert who understands the role of this court in providing standards and guidance for the entire civil court system; and Triana is one of the state's most experienced judges who won a tough 3rd Court of Appeals general election in 2018, overcoming slanderous Republican personal attacks. Triana has also concisely defined for Democratic voters the stakes at the Supreme Court: "This court is sorely lacking in balance. We need a Court that guarantees a level playing field; that does not put special interests ahead of everyday Texans in crucial issues like health care, a clean environment, social justice, and the need for honest economic dealing." We urge voters to work their way down the lengthy primary ballot and cast their votes for these qualified judges.

Court of Criminal Appeals PLACE 3: DAN WOOD PLACE 4: TINA CLINTON

In recent decades, the Court of Criminal Appeals – the last resort in Texas for challenges to unjust criminal verdicts – has been stacked with Republicans, with predictably dismal rulings (especially on capital punishment cases). November could take steps to restore a balance: Democrats will contest three of four expiring GOP terms. In Place 9, Brandon Birmingham is uncontested. In Place 3, the *Chronicle* recommends criminal appellate attorney Dan Wood. In Place 4, we recommend Dallas District Judge Tina Clinton, a former defense attorney with lengthy experience on and off the bench.

TEXAS LEGISLATURE

HOUSE DISTRICT 45: ERIN ZWIENER HOUSE DISTRICT 51: EDDIE RODRIGUEZ

Both freshman Zwiener and dean-ofthe-delegation Rodriguez have drawn token opposition in the primary; neither should be in any danger, but there is no reason not to (keep going down the ballot and) vote for them just to make sure. Zwiener, unlike Rodriguez, is sure to face a tough reelection fight in her Hays/Blanco swing district in November.

LOCAL JUDICIAL

CHIEF JUSTICE, 3RD COURT OF APPEALS: KEITH HAMPTON


The 3rd Court (of 14) has been another venue where good appeals go to die. The 2018 shift toward better balance may begin to change that. Democratic voters have excellent candidates in legendary appellate attorney Hampton and deeply experienced District Judge Darlene Byrne, a distinguished expert in family and juvenile law. Hampton has been victorious on appellate cases for decades, with hard-fought victories on capital punishment and exonerations such as Lacresha Murray and the notorious Keller day care case. He also sees his candidacy as a strategic response to the hard-right stacking of federal courts which state appellate justices must be able to counteract. On balance, the Chronicle nod goes to Hampton.

DISTRICT JUDGE, 53RD DISTRICT: KENNON WOOTEN

Both attorneys and very sportsmanlike candidates, Wooten and Maria Cantú Hexsel are highly qualified to run the civil court: Wooten has worked with the state and local bar as well as the Texas Supreme Court; Hexsel has worked in the Attorney General's Office and supported local nonprofits. However, Wooten tipped the scales ever so slightly for us with her compassionate awareness of transgender legal issues often handled by civil court judges.

DISTRICT JUDGE, 167TH DISTRICT: DAVID WAHLBERG

The institutional tension between prosecution and defense has somewhat shadowed this campaign, generating speculation that prosecutors' irritation at some of incumbent Judge Wahlberg's rulings generated an election challenge. Nevertheless, former defense attorney Wahlberg and longtime

felony prosecutor Dayna Blazey exemplify the best in their chosen professions, and a difficult choice for Democratic voters. The *Chronicle* recommendation goes to Wahlberg as an effective jurist and for a balanced courtroom mindset that reinforces confidence in local justice.

DISTRICT JUDGE, 200TH DISTRICT: JESSICA MANGRUM

Mangrum and Maggie Ellis would both make great judges, but we feel Mangrum is better suited for the totality of work facing a judge in the 200th. Her background is in trying a broad range of civil cases, while Ellis mostly has experience in family law. We think Ellis would do well overseeing one of Travis County's family courts, but the 200th is not one of them, so Mangrum has our support in this race.

DISTRICT JUDGE, 353RD DISTRICT: TIM SULAK

This one is easy: Thrice-elected Democratic incumbent Sulak is a distinguished, fair-minded judge known for his even-handed demeanor and thoughtful decisions. His opponent is an intermittent GOP candidate who has been officially declared – in two state courts – a sanctioned "vexatious litigant." We strongly endorse Judge Sulak.

DISTRICT JUDGE, 390TH DISTRICT: JULIE KOCUREK

The only surprise here is that 20-year incumbent Judge Kocurek drew an opponent at all. Kocurek is known as a groundbreaking candidate and fair judge (more recently as the victim of a 2015 assassination attempt). There is no reason for voters to reject an accomplished judge who is a leader in local justice reform.

DISTRICT JUDGE, 460TH DISTRICT: SELENA ALVARENGA

This race is another closely contested one, for a new court where the Democratic candidates represent strong professional contrasts. Alvarenga is a 25-year criminal defense attorney (former executive director of the Criminal Defense Lawyers Association) - originally a young Salvadoran immigrant - who is also a prominent immigrant rights defender and LGBTQ advocate. Amy Meredith has been a prosecutor for 20 years and currently heads the Travis County District Attorney's important Public Integrity Unit. Each is highly qualified, but we're giving the nod to Alvarenga, who should provide balanced and broadening perspective to the bench.

TRAVIS COUNTY

DISTRICT ATTORNEY: JOSÉ GARZA

This is the most important race on the local ballot, and it's proved the most challenging for the *Chronicle* to achieve a consensus endorsement in. But we simply cannot endorse incumbent D.A. Margaret Moore for reelection. As we have reported extensively. Moore is under fire on many fronts for her perceived insufficient commitment to true justice, particularly for women survivors of sexual assault. We acknowledge that these criticisms can be countered by examples of Moore's progressive values put into practice, or offset by her work in righting the ship after the troubled years under Rosemary Lehmberg, or diffused by the recognition that Moore alone did not create what her opponent Garza rightly describes as a crisis of confidence and legitimacy for Travis County's justice system.

But we have also heard the tape and seen the transcript in which Moore's secondin-command, seemingly with Moore's blessing, gets on the phone with a private citizen to discuss and dismiss a woman's account of her own rape in an effort to undermine and defame her. That's one very specific, severe, documented transgression that should be disqualifying to a public servant. Are there others? We don't know.

Of her two opponents, we feel Garza has a broader and deeper grasp of the range of issues the next D.A. must face than does Erin Martinson, and he would also bring to the job a demonstrable commitment to equity and the leadership experience he has honed in his current role as executive director of Workers Defense Project. Either would be preferable to an incumbent who we feel is simply too compromised to continue in office.

COUNTY ATTORNEY: LAURIE EISERLOH

Bringing criminal justice reforms to the County Attorney's Office should be the top priority of the next occupant of the office, and the four candidates here have each promised to fight institutional bias in the system. We're fans of Delia Garza's work on City Council and her passion toward criminal justice reform, but feel her limited experience in trying cases doesn't fit the requirements of the job. Dominic Selvera, the outsider candidate, has an admirable commitment to disrupting the CJ system, but we feel he's not ready for this level of office. Judge Mike Denton is certainly qualified,

but the backlog of cases Denton left behind when he stepped down from the bench at County Court at Law No. 4 raises questions about his time there. All things considered, we value Eiserloh's detailed knowledge of the C.A.'s Office, and we think she offers the best combination of experience, commitment to reform, and achievable policy to actually get that work done. We did pause to reconsider our choice as we've reported on the negative campaigning against Garza (see p.38 and online to learn more) - ostensibly by third parties but with disconcertingly close ties to the Eiserloh campaign. We believe our readers, as informed voters, should and will send a signal to candidates now, and at the polls, about what level of mudslinging or dark-money gamesmanship they will tolerate.

SHERIFF: SALLY HERNANDEZ

Between standing up to Gov. Greg Abbott to defend undocumented immigrants, ending arrests for possessing small amounts of marijuana, and implementing progressive changes at the county jail, Sheriff Hernandez has earned our endorsement. (That said, we're not so keen on a new jail in Del Valle, and we wish Hernandez would rejoin SARRT.) Former APD Sergeant Liz Donegan is another strong candidate, who would be laser-focused on survivors of sexual assaults, but she is not as well-rounded as Hernandez on the range of issues facing Travis County's jail system.

JUDGE, COUNTY COURT AT LAW NO. 4: DIMPLE MALHOTRA

This blandly named court is crucial as the misdemeanor "Family Violence Court" and has been contentious as a fault line between prosecutors and the defense bar. Incumbent Judge Malhotra was a specialized domestic violence prosecutor when she was appointed last fall by the Commissioners Court; challengers Tanisa Jeffers (also a municipal judge) and Margaret Chen Kercher are experienced criminal defense attorneys. Malhotra has quickly taken necessary steps to reduce the case "backlog" and to include all stakeholders in improving court efficiency and facilitating diversion, while rebalancing the perceived scales between accusers and accused. We believe she deserves a full term to fulfill those programs.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER, PRECINCT 3: ANN HOWARD

Democrats have come close to taking the only GOP-held seat on the Travis County Commissioners Court in the past two cycles, and with incumbent Gerald Daugherty stepping down, 2020 represents their best shot at taking it - and possibly holding it for years to come. Of the four candidates (Howard, Valinda Bolton, Sheri Soltes, and Shiloh Newman), two have risen to the top - and we feel Howard is best among them. Her tenure as director of the Ending Community Homelessness Coalition gave her insight into the needs of the most marginalized in the county and an opportunity to learn how to pull the policy levers of local government to impact the lives of all people, including those without homes. Bolton, former HD 47 Rep., is a formidable and gualified opponent who would represent western Travis County well, but Howard's recent on-theground experience gives her the edge.

CONSTABLE, PRECINCT 1: TONYA NIXON CONSTABLE, PRECINCT 2: ADAN BALLESTEROS

What does a constable do? Well, they can do a lot more than serve legal papers, and we're glad to see young, energetic groundbreaker Nixon wanting to take over the Pct. 1 constable's shop from retiring incumbent Danny Thomas. Creating opportunities for responsive community-facing justice and law enforcement, especially in the traditionally African American Pct. 1, is a job Austin needs to do better, and Nixon can do it. In Pct. 2, incumbent Ballesteros deserves voters' continued support.



RACIAL DISPARITIES IN DRUG ARRESTS The Texas Criminal Justice Coalition. Texas Harm Reduction Alliance, Grassroots Leadership, and UT Law Civil Rights Clinic have released preliminary key findings of a new report highlighting racial disparities in low-level drug possession arrests in Travis County. Analyzing less-thana-gram drug possession arrests in a one-year period, findings revealed Black residents represented 29.4% of the arrests studied while only comprising less than 9% of the county's population. In arrests involving Latinx individuals, 57% originated from motor vehicle stops. For Black motorists, that number was 44%. The report will be published in full later this month.

CHOO-CHOO CH-BOOGIE! Addressing the worst rail emergency since the Denzel Washington film Unstoppable, City Council hopes to save the inoperable Zilker Zephyr kiddie train by collaborating with the Austin Parks Foundation or another nonprofit to get the line repaired and the train running again. The resolution by CM Paige Ellis asks for a staff progress report by the end of June.

PIPELINE LAWSUIT The city of Austin and several other jurisdictions have filed a federal lawsuit asking for an injunction against further construction of the Permian Highway Pipeline (running from the Permian Basin to Houston, through the Hill Country and south of Austin). Plaintiffs also include San Marcos, Kyle, Hays and Travis Counties, the Barton Springs Edwards Aquifer Conservation District, and several private landowners.

SHOW ME THE MONEY The U.S. Department of Labor announced that Polvo's Mexican Restaurant (three locations in Austin) is required to pay \$98,520 in back wages and damages to 19 employees. An investigation found that kitchen employees were being paid flat weekly salaries without overtime pay, as well as violations of record-keeping and information obligations under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

BERNIE BEATS BUTTIGIEG (BARELY) Senator Bernie Sanders won the New Hampshire primary Tuesday by a narrow margin, while former South Bend, Ind., Mayor Pete Buttigieg finished close behind. The biggest surprise of the night was perhaps third-place finisher Senator Amy Klobuchar, who was followed by Senator Elizabeth Warren and former Vice President Joe Biden, respectively. Andrew Yang, Michael Bennet, and Deval Patrick have also dropped out of the 2020 presidential race.

FLY US TO THE MOON Unsurprisingly, the Trump administration's proposed FY 2021 federal budget would spike defense spending while slashing human services including Social Security, food stamps, student loans, Medicaid, and low-income housing programs in exchange for extended tax cuts, more nukes, and the Space Force!

Point Austin dissents from the *Chronicle* Editorial Board's view of the incumbent

"It's silly season" - Travis County Democratic primary time - a period that combines the deadly earnest with the completely absurd, never entirely free of foolishness. At the Chronicle, our Editorial

Board (a seasonal collaboration of publisher, editor-in-chief, News editor, and News staff) consults on endorsements. Some we find easy, some (reflecting good candidates) are quite difficult, but we try our best in anticipation of voters who have to make the same tough choices.

Usually we can come to a consensus choice, but not always. This year my colleagues and I couldn't agree on the choice

for Travis County District Attorney - or rather, I couldn't agree with the endorsement of José Garza over incumbent Margaret Moore. I think Garza's a fine person who has done good work with the Workers

Defense Project, and attorney Erin Martinson has been a fierce advocate for victims of crime. I do question whether either of the challengers has sufficient experience to assume management and leadership of the D.A.'s Office - a high-pressure law

firm with more than 200 attorneys and staff members - but if either should win, we'll find out.

My particular objection is to the way this

campaign has portrayed the incumbent (and by extension the entire D.A.'s Office), creating a caricature of Moore as personally responsible for all the legion of troubles that bedevil the criminal justice system, not just in Travis County but across the U.S. Her opponents have used that caricature as a punching bag for every problem we haven't yet solved as a community, while going out of their way to ignore or denigrate the progress Moore has indeed made since assuming office in 2017. National groups with virtually no knowledge of local circumstances have pontificated on the race, and even Elizabeth Warren (bless her heart) has put in a word.

DOCUMENTED PROGRESS

When Moore resumed a lengthy public career to become D.A., she was effectively rescuing and stabilizing an office that had fallen into disarray and disrespect in the last years of the Rosemary Lehmberg administration, with collateral problems involving the Austin Police Department DNA lab. Since that time, she has made tangible progress on all fronts debated on the campaign trail, with the main substantive charge against her being "not fast enough," one that implicitly assumes the D.A. has a magic reforming wand she's refusing to use out of sheer cussedness.

Yet in three years, she's accomplished important initiatives, including:

• Based in part on research she commissioned concerning racial inequities, she moved to reduce thousands of minor drug

possession cases from "state jail felonies" to misdemeanors, while promoting diversion programs to move more cases into public health care instead of law enforcement;

 She created new Adult Sexual Assault and Family Violence Units, while increasing prosecutions - and convictions - in these cases over the office's previous levels;

• She established a Civil Rights Division and Civil Rights Advisory Council, enabling conviction integrity review as well as the public review of all police shooting incidents, thereby expanding public involvement and transparency instead of conven-

tional grand jury secrecy (That her opponents want to return to the grand jury process is frankly baffling - the logic appears to be: Moore did it, so it must be bad.);

• Most recently, she has successfully collaborated with all stakeholders to officially reduce the use of cash bail in misdemeanor cases and is moving toward a similar process on felonies. It's too soon to judge that change - but it exemplifies Moore's nutsand-bolts approach to progress, rather than brandishing slogans.

Also worth recalling: Moore personally reviewed the entire case history in the notoriously unjust Keller daycare prosecution and took the unprecedented step of officially exonerating Fran and Dan Keller, something her predecessor refused to do.

There's always more to be debated, and since reporters retain a professional skep-

> ticism about all prosecutors, no matter who becomes D.A., the Chronicle will continue to consider them suspects until proven otherwise. I hope the D.A.'s Office will not have to underanother chaotic go sea change next year - when the myriad social problems we relentlessly shovel onto law enforcement,

prosecutors, criminal defense, and courts will continue to resist quick and easy solutions. But I believe Moore has done her level best to officially address her share of those problems, and that based on her documented progress, she deserves the chance to continue her good work.

Operating at Full Capacity?

We all need some slack ... and what ET says about housing

As we go to press, the Land Development Code rewrite rambles on at City Council. With three amendments down after Tuesday, 76 more to be debated and voted on (see p.30), and some language still being drafted by various council offices, we're looking at late nights both Wednesday and Thursday, unless Council allows the debate to spill over past that.

Thankfully, there won't be any more discussion of housing capacity numbers. I say that partly because those numbers remain

one of the silliest parts of the whole LDC discussion (see last week's column, "How Many Angels Fit PUBLIC in a Zone?"), but also partly NOTICE because I made a dumb mistake in that column, which I hate. I wrote that the count of citywide housing capacity assumes that no housing will be added in any residential zones in the new code. But in fact, there is an increase projected in the transition zones - R3, R4, and RM1 - of some 11.374 units. Not zero. Sorry. The bulk of the 400,000 or so units will come from denser multifamily zones, plus mixeduse, Downtown, and the like.

It's worth noting a few more things about these numbers, though. First, it remains true that staff projects that there will be zero accessory dwelling units, second units, or preservation bonus units added to any existing houses in other residential zones what's currently called single-family zoning. That's because their Envision Tomorrow tool judges that such developments don't make economic sense. A homeowner might choose

to build such a thing for their own reasons,

but a developer couldn't make it work "based on market conditions and land cost."

Second, given those criteria, the ET tool ("ET make home"?) apparently decided that maybe a 10th of the properties in the transition zones do make economic sense for a developer to buy and rebuild, thus vielding those 11.374 units. But analyses of the first draft of the map showed wide disparities between areas of town in which ET thinks it can make homes: The Eastside is still a good buy; Duval and Enfield, not so much.

The new draft removed most of the transition areas on the Eastside,

> and there hasn't been time to see that sort of analysis of the new map before Council finishes voting on it.

And what's the hurry, again? That hasn't really been articulated, beyond the fact that it's tedious and everyone is tired of dealing with

it. But again, given that this is supposedly a once-in-a-generation process and the amendments being passed show that there's work left to be done and improvements are being made, you'd think it could be done with full information available and at times of day when all relevant parties are awake.

Meanwhile, the lawsuit claiming that property owners have protest rights over rezonings in the LDC rewrite, originally set for Feb. 18, has been postponed to Monday, March 9, with plaintiffs' attorney Doug Becker saying the "short postponement of the trial will still facilitate a quick answer."

COUNTY ATTORNEY RACE: QUALIFICATIONS MATTER

Dear Travis County Voters,

As Travis County Commissioners, we must set the record straight concerning assertions made by Delia Garza in her campaign for County Attorney. The tipping point was when Ms. Garza claimed that county officials just turned over our voter rolls when the Texas Secretary of State "demanded it". This claim is false. IN FACT, our Voter Registrar Bruce Elfant refused their demand and, working alongside the County Attorney, actively participated in a federal lawsuit filed by voting rights advocates against the Texas Secretary of State. That case was successful and Elfant received national acclaim for helping lead the fight against the state's attempt to unconstitutionally purge voters from the rolls.

Ms. Garza also describes the County Attorney position as a "political" position, but IN FACT the County Attorney is a legal position under the Texas Constitution and statutes. As members of the Travis County Commissioners Court managing a \$1.2 billion dollar budget, we rely on the County Attorney to provide us with precise, professional and ethical legal counsel, not political advice. The Travis County Attorney must have deep knowledge of the law, overseeing all criminal misdemeanor cases and civil legal services for the County while managing 230+ staff, including over 80 lawyers and a \$24 million budget. Retiring County Attorney David Escamilla had 20 years of relevant legal expertise and courtroom experience when he took office in 2003.

The County Attorney serves as Chief Legal Counsel for the Commissioners Court, AND for <u>50+ elected and appointed county officials</u>. The position demands an experienced attorney who understands the law and legal strategies in multiple areas:

- ✓ Negotiates multi-million dollar contracts
- ✓ Drafts policies and regulations
- Advises on employment and labor law
- ✓ Litigates multi-million dollar disputes
- ✓ Serves as the legal General Counsel for Central Health
- ✓ Handles delinquent taxes for over 100 taxing jurisdictions in Travis County area
- Enforces environmental regulations, open government, transparency and ethics disclosure laws
- Represents Travis County in all litigation
- Responsible for over 25,000 misdemeanor cases every year, and ensuring justice is done for the victims as well as the defendants. The Travis County Attorney helped create and supports all the misdemeanor diversion courts such as Veterans, DWI, Family Violence, Phoenix (prostitution), Project Engage (youth), and Mental Health.

Legal Experience Is Vital. We must be able to trust our County Attorney and the legal counsel they provide. Regrettably, Ms. Garza's lack of legal credentials is of great concern. Since passing the bar in 2011, she only has a total of three years of employment as a lawyer, and her State Bar of Texas records show:

- Law license suspended twice for failure to pay dues in 2015 and 2017.
- Law license inactive from October 2014 through August 2018.
- Received suspension warnings in 2018 and 2019.

Delia Garza's track record does not give us confidence that she is serious about the practice of law.

As women who have long supported electing other women to higher office, it does not make us happy to oppose a female candidate. Even if we were to set aside Ms. Garza's lack of legal experience, we believe there are conflicts of interest that cannot be ignored. The County Attorney has statutory authority to investigate and criminally charge elected officials on ethics violations, including City Council Members. Concerns have been raised about Ms. Garza's decision to continue voting on City Council issues while raising campaign contributions above what the legal limit would be if running for a Council seat. For example, it was brought to our attention that Ms. Garza sent a campaign solicitation email during a "Code Next" Council meeting. Although it may be technically legal, the optics are bad.

Although we support different candidates in this race, we are unified in our belief that Delia Garza is not qualified to be our next County Attorney.

Learning to Code

Council shapes land use overhaul on second reading

City Council was in the middle of more debate on the **Land Development Code rewrite** on Wednesday, Feb. 12, as the *Chronicle* went to press, and expects to vote on approval of the new code on second reading (out of three) later today, Thursday, Feb. 13. As with the first-reading vote in December, each member is trying to bend the unwieldy code to their will through amendments – both specific changes to the latest code text and directions to staff on how to refine the document ahead of its third and final reading, tentatively scheduled for early March.

Debate began late in the afternoon on Tuesday, Feb. 11, after members of the public were afforded another opportunity to weigh in. Unsurprisingly, the arguments voiced during that two-hour session generally reflected what LDC activists have said for years: one group urging Council to restrain the LDC's proposed entitlement increases, especially in the central city where Austin's historic neighborhoods are already dense; another insisting Council must upzone those neighborhoods and all parts of the city if the code is to bear the golden fruit both sides agree they want – affordable housing.

Unfortunately for us on the News desk, that public comment period was followed by another two hours of executive session, meaning Council did not actually begin working through amendments until 3pm, with a 5pm hard stop (some on the dais are parents, and finding childcare outside of regular business hours ain't easy). So they didn't get much work done on Tuesday, but the few amendments they did debate are substantive enough to examine here; we'll have more to say online on Friday, after the second-reading vote.

As of press time, council members had submitted 85 total amendments - compared to 140 or so at first reading. By adjournment on Tuesday, four had been withdrawn (one from CM Greg Casar and three from CM Jimmy Flannigan). Two were set without debate for approval at second reading: One from Casar changes uses in higher-density zones to "only allow a portion of the pedestrian-oriented uses to be a residential lobby or resident-only uses, unless staff grants a waiver." The other, from Mayor Steve Adler, directs staff to revise the text to "include a stand-alone definition for Live Music Venue use," distinct from the existing defined uses for Performance Venues and Bars/Nightclubs.

The other 79 were all pulled for further discussion by one or more of the CMs.

That left enough time for Council to debate three of those amendments – two set for approval, one rejected by an atypically split vote. The first came from CM **Natasha Harper-Madison**, directing staff to increase the allowable **floor-to-area ratio** (**FAR**) for duplexes to 0.5 in residential zones where the FAR is currently set at 0.4. That means that people building duplexes would be able to use half of the square footage of the lot for the structure, up from 40% in the current code. (In much of the central city, the real FAR is actually less than 0.4 due to **McMansion Ordinance** restrictions on building size.)

The amendment was approved on familiar lines: seven votes in favor, with CMs **Kathie Tovo**, **Leslie Pool**, and **Alison Alter** opposed, CM **Ann Kitchen** abstaining. The disagreement over the amendment offers a clear example of the central tension on the dais: a desire among the majority to use the code to create as many opportunities as possible for homeowners and developers to create more housing units throughout the city, and a fear among the minority that taking that approach will lead to exploitation of the code in ways that create fewer and more expensive housing options.



FAR to build a single-family home, a pool, and then a pool house – gaming the code to get a larger house. "Pool houses are not a [District 1] problem," Harper-Madison responded. "A lack of housing supply is."

Another amendment from Harper-Madison to incentivize more units failed 4-6-1, with Casar and Adler joining the minority in rejecting it (Mayor Pro Tem **Delia Garza** abstained). The opponents concluded that the amendment language could result in "**missing middle**" housing in zones (R2B) that were not mapped for that use.

Finally, Casar's amendment to modify the LDC's **preservation bonus** was approved 8-3 (Alter, Pool, and Kitchen voting against,

The premise of Harper-Madison's amendment is that a greater FAR might make larger duplex units more attractive and profitable for a developer to build and market than a single home. But the fear, as expressed by Alter, is that owners would instead exploit that increased FAR allowance for their personal use. "I just think we're getting bigger and bigger units and disincentivizing a larger number of units," explained the District 10 rep, adding that the new code does not require duplexes to be physically connected. She cited a hypothetical property owner using the increased with Tovo only voting in favor of some of the amendment provisions). The amendment brings several changes to the bonus, most notably reducing the age of a qualifying structure from 30 years to 15 years. As Casar explained, a homeowner who built their house in the early 2000s should be allowed to take advantage of the bonus, which can permit up to three units on a lot if the original structure is at least partially preserved. Other changes would reduce the minimum lot size where the bonus can be applied, and let owners move their home within the lot. Opponents argued these



changes to the bonus – which as currently drafted require only 50% of the original structure to remain intact – will incentivize partial teardowns rather than protecting existing affordable housing stock.

Casar passed a similar change to the bonus on first reading, which staff chose not to implement. This time, as lead code writer **Brent Lloyd** explained, "We are just going to defer entirely to Council's wishes on this. If they want to lower [the age] to 15 years, we can work with that."

Council also met last Thursday, Feb. 6, and approved two notable contracts – one, regarding Austin Police Department's **body cameras**, drew attention from criminal justice reform activists both on and off the dais (see p.32). The other authorized City Manager **Spencer Cronk** to contract with **Matthew Doherty**, head of the **U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness** until being forced out by President Trump, to provide consulting services on homelessness policy.

Despite a 10-1 vote in favor, some CMs were concerned that the proposed contract, for eight months at a cost of \$95,000, was vague and the work he would be doing unclear. Flannigan, who voted against the contract, said he was not "sufficiently educated" on what Doherty would be doing and preferred staff spend more time examining the fallout from the short tenure and abrupt departure of Homeless Strategy Office chief Lori Pampilo Harris. Assistant City Manager Chris Shorter, who oversees the newly created Homeless Services Division. said the contract would be "tailored and very strategic," but acknowledged that Doherty's scope of work had not been fully sketched out. Meanwhile, Shorter explained, the city will seek a new full-time leader for the HSD.

ACTIVISTS, COUNCIL PUSH APD ON BODY CAM VIDEO POLICY

City leaders and criminal justice activists are renewing their calls to finalize a policy regulating how and when footage from **body cameras** worn by **Austin police officers** is released. Last week at City Council, during approval of a \$48 million contract with **Axon Enterprise Inc.**, the company that provides APD with Tasers and the body cams officers wear, activists said a policy ensuring the automatic and expedient release of body cam footage in use-of-force cases or when officers are accused of misconduct would foster greater trust in police-community relations.

Citing a specific, high-profile example, justice advocates **Chris Harris**, **Emily Gerrick**, and **Chas Moore** played at Council recently released body cam video of a tasing that occurred nearly two years ago. Officers **Donald Petraitis** and **Robert Pfaff** responded to a gunshot-wound call near Red River and 12th Street on Feb. 16, 2018; Pfaff eventually used his stun gun on **Quentin Perkins** as the two officers sought to lock down the crime scene.

In later incident reports, both officers falsely wrote that Perkins looked like he was about to flee. The body cam video shows, however, that Perkins was on his knees with his hands in the air. The incident led to a civil suit filed by Perkins, which the city settled for \$75,000; the officers faced criminal charges including assault, tampering with physical evidence, and official oppression and abuse of official capacity. Pfaff and Petraitis were acquitted at trial but fired from APD by Chief **Brian Manley** after he concluded that aspects of

their incident reports were "simply not true." Harris told the *Chronicle* that the Perkins case

shows the "promise and problem" with body cams. "We're told [cameras] will improve the behavior of both officers and the people they're interacting with," Harris said, "but if the footage never comes out, it's less likely that the presence of that body cam will impact behavior." To that end, activists have been working with APD and the **Office of Police Oversight** on a body cam policy since early 2019, and on Feb. 6, Council urged OPO and APD to release that policy by the end of March.

Crafting the policy has been prolonged by unsurprising tensions between activists and the **Austin Police Association**, with the union warning that releasing body cam video could compromise investigations or threaten the privacy of peo-

ple depicted in the video. The still-emerging APD policy is modeled after that of the Los Angeles Police Department, which in 2018 mandated that video of "critical incidents" such as police shootings, lethal encounters, and others deemed to be of public interest be released within 45 days. That time frame can be extended to protect the safety of individuals involved, police investigations, or an individual's constitutional rights.

Activists still have reservations about whether an APD policy will meaningfully improve police transparency, given Texas law that allows police chiefs wide discretion in what video footage is released. That discretion can also work in favor of accountability – allowing expedited release of video for what a chief determines as "law enforcement purpose." Advocates argue that trust between police and the communities they serve should be a goal of APD, and thus qualifies as a reason for making more video public rather than less.

In addition to the types of incidents specifically addressed by the LAPD policy, Harris told us instances of misconduct that don't result in injury or death should be considered. "We're erring on releasing more types of events," Harris said, "because doing so would better help body cams serve their intended purpose, which is to improve accountability."

APA President **Ken Casaday** hadn't seen the specific policy language being considered as we went to press, but he told us he's generally in support of releasing footage when an officer shoots a person. He's open to considering other interactions as candidates for automatic release but would first like to see a trial period where only video from shootings is released. While Casaday shared some concerns raised by officers – that releasing video could violate due-process protections for alleged offenders and could negatively affect the families of shooting victims – he concludes that greater transparency is a benefit to both officers and the public. "I want citizens to see what we see," Casaday said. "How devastating it is for an individual to get shot, and how devastating it can be for the officer to use lethal force." – Austin Sanders

Will New Policy Reduce the Burden of Cash Bail?

As we reported Feb. 7, last week the seven judges of the Travis County misdemeanor criminal courts issued a "**Standing Order**" to officially expand the use of "**personal recognizance bonds**" for people arrested in the county. In principle, the order ("effective immediately") would authorize those accused of most nonviolent offenses to be released on personal bonds (i.e., without **cash bail**). Personal bonds are essentially a written promise to return for court appointments or face sanctions for noncompliance. ("Travis Judges Loosen Misdemeanor Bond Requirements," Feb. 7).

On Tuesday, the county's Justice Planning staff, District Attorney Margaret Moore, County Attorney David Escamilla, and others briefed the Commissioners Court on the background and details of the new policy - still a work in progress, in development over several years and relying on jail population research by county staff. Currently, an arrested person appears before a **city magistrate** following a case and risk assessment by the county Pretrial Services staff. In Travis County, most people accused of misdemeanors (about 71%) are already released on personal bonds. It's not immediately clear how many more may be eligible under the new policy, but the order sets formal standards for use by magistrates.

The order begins: "In the interest of justice and fairness for all persons accused of misdemeanor crimes, the Travis County Court at Law Judges, having been notified in writing that the Travis County Attorney does not object to the adoption of this Order, have determined that all persons arrested for misdemeanor crimes should be released on personal bonds except for in the instances listed in this Standing Order."



The listed exceptions include assaults, violation of protective orders, recurring DWIs (within five years), school-related firearm offenses, violation of previous bond provisions, persons on hold for other jurisdictions, and others considered to "present an imminent danger to the community." (The order was accompanied by a direction to magistrates and a memorandum to Pretrial Services outlining the new policy.)

County officials are not predicting dramatic changes in current misdemeanor bonding, although they told commissioners they hope for incremental increases in personal bond issuance. Moore told the *Chronicle* she believes one effect will be on those cases where judges now overrule magistrates who have set cash bonds – the written standards would presumably define more precisely those who are automatically granted personal bonds. (Officials are developing a related policy for those charged with felonies, which would eventually require approval and implementation by district judges.)

The new policy has been met with skepticism from some criminal justice advocates, who say the pretrial review and magistration process remains too complex in application, and who fear that the "exceptions" – particularly the "imminent danger to the community" standard – leave far too much discretion to the magistrates. Several reform groups (**Texas Fair Defense Project**, Austin Justice Coalition, and others) released a statement Friday sharply criticizing the retention of pretrial interviews and magistration and especially the "catch-all" exception. Amanda Woog of the Texas Fair Defense Project told us (and reiterated to commissioners Tuesday) that the "imminent danger" provision is "an exception that could swallow the rule." Annette Price of Grassroots Leadership said in the statement, "Anything that falls short of release before magistration is unacceptable."

Attorney **José "Chito" Vela**, whose practice includes immigration work as well as criminal law across Central Texas, called the new policy a step forward that will require continuing review: "Travis County bond policy has been comparatively good in general, but it's better to have formal standards." He also noted that the best practice is not always obvious – for his clients experiencing immigration holds, for example, it's sometimes better to remain jailed in Travis County than to be bonded out and transferred to a federal detention center away from family and legal counsel.

County officials have been working on the new policy for a while, but it is also part-

ly a response to similar changes in **Harris County** that were prompted both by Democratic victories in local judicial races and a federal lawsuit (in which the Texas Fair Defense Project was a party) that led to a consent decree on bail policy late last year. At Commissioners Court Tuesday, opinion was divided on which county's new policy represents greater progress - but county leaders expressed willingness to continue improving the policy and working with the city on the magistration issue. Unspoken but implicit in all the discussions is that cash bail reform has been a heated issue in the current Democratic primary campaigns for prosecutors and judges alike – and no one wants to be accused of falling behind – Michael King the curve.

County Names Its First Chief Public Defender



Last week, in a culminating vote that took roughly one minute, **Travis County Commissioners Court** took the next major step toward establishing a **public defender office**: appointing University of Virginia Law School lecturer **Adeola Ogunkeyede** as the county's first **chief public defender**. According to the official announcement, Ogunkeyede will provide "robust and client-centered representation to adults accused of misdemeanor and felony offenses ... and improve the quality of public defense representation countywide." Congratulating the new appointee in a press release, County Judge **Sarah Eckhardt** said, "I am confident Adeola has the skills, experience, creativity and commitment to lead the County in producing a Public Defender Office all Travis County can be proud of."

Ogunkeyede has been prominent in public defender work for years, first with the nonprofit **the Bronx Defenders** (as director of staff development as well as criminal litigation supervisor), and more recently in Virginia as legal director of the **Legal Ald Justice Center**'s Civil Rights and Racial Justice Program. In accepting her new role, Ogunkeyede said, "I am honored to return to the ranks of public defenders who defend local communities, hold the state to account, and promote a more just and equitable society."

When Ogunkeyede's work officially begins (she's scheduled to arrive in April), Travis County will lose its status as the largest jurisdiction in the country without a public defender office, an agency charged with the responsibility of representing criminal defendants who can't afford to hire attorneys. Until now, that job has been performed by court-appointed private attorneys through the **Capital Area Private Defender Service**. The extended, years-long effort to create the new office required collaboration among county officials, criminal justice advocates, and the defense bar – a protracted process that concluded with a \$20 million grant from the **Texas Indigent** **Defense Commission** (matched by the county), which will underwrite the first four years of the new program ("\$20 Million State Grant Comes Through for Indigent Defense," Sept. 6, 2019).

The eventual plan is for the PDO to represent 30% of indigent cases, with 70% remaining with CAPDS. A sizable portion of the grant will provide new resources to CAPDS attorneys, who will also be transitioning from the current, inequitable, flat-fee (per case) system to an hourly rate structure. The intention is for the two agencies to collaborate for a stronger overall system of indigent defense.

Commissioners welcomed their new hire, as did defense advocate **Amanda Woog** of **Texas Fair Defense Project**. "Ogunkeyede hails from one of the best public defender offices [Bronx Defenders] in the country," said Woog. "I saw her public interview, and she really seems to have the 'defender vision' that she intends to bring to Travis County." — *Michael King*

A Setback on Sexual Assault

Judge dismisses rape survivors' lawsuit against D.A., APD

U.S. District Judge Lee Yeakel has dismissed the sexual assault class action lawsuit filed by eight local rape survivors against the Austin Police Department and the Travis County District Attorney's Office. His long-awaited decision was delivered Monday, Feb. 10, in a 32-page ruling, in which he declined to take up the majority of claims put forth in the survivors' lawsuit, thus closing the case in his court but leaving space for the women to possibly refile the bulk of their case in a different court.

The survivors' suit, originally filed in June 2018 by three local women and amended that August with five additional plaintiffs, argued that systemic failures within the local criminal justice system have led to inequitable treatment of women survivors based on their gender, thereby violating their constitutional rights. Along with the city and county entities, Travis County D.A. Margaret Moore and her predecessor Rosemary Lehmberg were named individually as defendants in the suit, as were Austin police Chief Brian Manley and his predecessor Art Acevedo. Yeakel heard the defendants' motions to dismiss in December 2018, but writes that he waited to rule on the case until the 86th Texas Legislature ended its session in May 2019, "in order to have the benefit of any action by the Legislature on the issues presented here."

Indeed, the Legislature did pass several bills last session to improve how sexual assault is investigated, prosecuted, and responded to across Texas – including the creation of a statewide **Sexual Assault Survivors' Task Force** and \$78 million in funding to expedite **rape kit testing**. In his decision, Yeakel also cites City Council's unanimous vote in January 2019 to have a third party conduct a comprehensive evaluation of how APD investigates sexual assaults. Over the summer, the defendants argued that in light of new state laws and the external audit, "the court should defer to Texas' legislative power and the city's municipal power and decline to exercise jurisdiction based on federal-abstention doctrines."

Yeakel, considering the motion to dismiss on grounds of "lack of subject-matter jurisdiction and for failure to state claims for which relief may be granted," ultimately dismissed with prejudice (that is, permanently) six of the plaintiffs' claims, including one specific to the individual case of Amy Smith (a pseudonym). Smith, who was kidnapped and raped in 2008, submitted to a rape kit, but a major DNA testing contamination at APD's now-shuttered forensics lab led officers to question her "truthfulness"; her attacker later fled to Houston, where he raped at least two other women before getting arrested again. He's never faced a trial in Austin, and the suit claims Moore dismissed local charges in 2017, telling Smith he'd "get justice in Houston."

For the majority of these six claims – including whether the D.A.'s Office acted improperly when deciding how to prosecute sexual assaults – Yeakel's dismissal hinges on the D.A.'s prosecutorial immunity and 11th Amendment immunity, noting that "contrary to Plaintiffs' contentions, prosecutorial immunity, which is an absolute immunity, extends beyond the courtroom." Several claims were dismissed with prejudice for failure to state a claim "for which relief may be granted."

Three additional claims – including the survivors' argument that APD and the D.A.'s Office violated their Fourth and Fifth Amendment rights by not testing (often for years) the rape kits submitted by victims or using them to identify, apprehend, and prosecute their attackers – were dismissed without prejudice (meaning the claims can be brought back, perhaps in state district court). On the survivors' remaining claims, Yeakel opted for "federal abstention" to not exercise jurisdiction over the case – to avoid

conflict with the state regarding policy-reform efforts on matters of "paramount public concern."

Citing "significant changes to Texas law related to the policies, practices, and procedures associated with investigating and prosecuting sexual assaults," Yeakel wrote that the passage of those new laws (which went into effect last

September) indicates a "strong statewide interest in changing the current manner in which municipalities, law enforcement, and prosecutors address sexual assaults in Texas," and "intrusion by the court at this juncture would have an impermissibly disruptive effect on the recently enacted Texas laws related to sexual assaults, which the court finds to be a matter of substantial public concern."

In a statement given to the *Chronicle* Monday evening, **Elizabeth Myers**, an attorney representing the survivors, said, "Our clients are obviously disappointed by this ruling, but it is not the end of their case or their fight for justice." Myers confirmed the lawyers are reviewing the order in detail, noting: "Our clients intend to pursue all legal options available to them."

Myers further noted that "Judge Yeakel did not issue a ruling with respect to the majority of the claims (or their substance) based on the premise that he should abstain because survivors and advocates have already been successful in changing laws and policies as a result of the Survivor Plaintiffs' willingness to shine a light on the issues. This ruling is certainly not a vindication for any of the Defendants or for

the systems in Travis County that continue to fail survivors; we hope the Defendants will begin the hard work of listening and trying to make positive change."

Survivor Justice Project, a grassroots organization working to improve the criminal justice system's response to sexual assault cases, told the *Chronicle*, "We want to pause in this

moment to recognize and share our gratitude with the courageous women who put it all out there to create change for survivors in Travis County. For using your voices and making yourselves vulnerable, we are so grateful."

A second lawsuit against Moore, her first assistant **Mindy Montford**, and Travis County – alleging defamation regarding a phone call Montford made to a third party in which she was recorded sharing private and seemingly false information about the case of a rape survivor – is still pending in Yeakel's court. – Sarah Marloff



4 REASONS TO VOTE AGAINST DELIA GARZA

Anti-Garza Website Heats Up C.A. Race

"I guess I should be flattered," said Mayor Pro Tem **Delia Garza**, currently a candidate for **Travis County Attorney**. "I have my first attack website." Garza was responding to the semi-anonymous, misleadingly named website – "**Delia Garza 4 Delia Garza**" – posted online a few days ago. The website amplifies claims already made against Garza on the campaign trail – that she serves "special interests," is "unqualified," and inexperienced – that have most aggressively been disseminated by former County Judge **Bill Aleshire** (who doesn't appear to be directly associated with the site). Garza has strongly rejected Aleshire's charges while wondering – like many observers – about his motivations. ("Former County Judge Rails Against Delia Garza," Jan. 10)

Who is actually behind the new site is rather murky. Otherwise un-labeled, a barely legible statement at the bottom of the home page reads "Political Ad Paid for by **Austin** **Communities First PAC**." That PAC's paperwork, filed Jan. 27 with the Travis County Clerk, says the treasurer is **Monica Maldonado**, and the "Decision Makers" are Maldonado, **Fred Lewis**, and **Linda Bailey**. Lewis and Bailey are both on the board of the anti-Land Development Code Revision group **Save Our City Austin** (which explains at least some of the hyperbolic anti-tax and property rights rhetoric on the site). A button on the site invites contributions. There are no readily visible connections to the campaigns of Garza's opponents, but sources within the campaigns report that the site is apparently a project initiated by consultant **Marc Duchen**, who until late last year was working for the **Laurie Eiserloh** campaign. Asked if there was any connection between the campaign and the site, Eiserloh campaign manager **David Weinberg** said the campaign "had nothing to do with this website and has no information about its origin." That was subsequently reiterated by Eiserloh herself, who said she had "only just glanced" at the site.

"From my view," Eiserloh said, "we consider it to be a distraction. We've got plenty of issues to work within this race, and it's not my way ... I'm not about tearing people down." Asked if it was possible that Duchen was behind the site, she said, "If it was, I don't know about it." She said Duchen was very competent but had left the campaign by "mutual understanding ... it just wasn't working out." Eiserloh continued, "I would never recommend support or encourage somebody to do that sort of website or campaigning."

The other campaigns expressed similar sentiments. Attorney **Dominic Selvera** said he had earlier publicly denounced Aleshire's charges against Garza, reiterated that denunciation, and had a similar response to the anonymous site. "It's the way cowards operate," he said. **Mike Denton**'s campaign issued a formal statement: "We are running a positive campaign focused on my record as a criminal justice reformer," it read. "We have not contributed to dark-money PAC's or encouraged anyone else to do so. All of our campaign's expenditures are fully reported and above board."

The problem with Eiserloh's denial is that a confidential source in a position to know

said that Duchen's public departure from her campaign was in fact for the purpose of initiating this nominally "independent" opposition effort while providing Eiserloh and her official campaign with plausible deniability. The campaign firmly and repeatedly denies it. And calls by the Chronicle hoping to discuss the matter with Duchen, Lewis, and Maldonado were not returned.

Instead, "AustinCommunitiesFirst PAC" responded with an unsigned email, taking the opportunity not to answer questions, but to take more shots at Garza. "We started the site," it read, "because we are alarmed at the mounting evidence that Delia Garza is unfit to serve as Travis County Attorney." The rest isn't worth repeating: if you want a full dose of the anonymous rhetoric, you can track down the site yourselves.

Negative campaigning is hardly new, but Selvera's judgment of this particular campaign strategy seems apt. Garza said she finds it ironic that Lewis, who was one of the loudest supporters of single-member districts, gets so outraged when the 10-1 Council doesn't follow his preferences. "I think it's just the old guard wanting to hold on," she said. "I've been successful in being a reformer at City Hall, and they don't want that happening at Travis County." - Michael King

Three Faiths, One Message: Welcome the Stranger

On Sunday, three faith communities – Judaism, Islam, and Christianity – came together at **Saint John's United Methodist Church** in recognition of one shared value: You must welcome the stranger and those in need.

Joining them were seven nonprofits and a panel of Austin refugee speakers, who had gathered in solidarity for an interfaith vigil protesting Governor Abbott's and President Trump's **anti-Immigrant policies**. In response to Abbott's (failed) attempt to ban refugee resettlement last month, the vigil was organized to support refugee resettlement in Austin and across the state of Texas.

"No commandment is repeated more in the sacred Torah than this mitzvah [commandment]: to love one another," Rabbi **Kelly Levy** of **Congregation Beth Israel** told the crowd. "It is easy to love your neighbor, because your neighbor is usually quite like yourself. What is hard is to love the stranger – one whose color, culture, or creed is different than yours. That's why the command 'Love the stranger because you were once strangers' resonates so often throughout the Bible."

Like Rabbi Levy, Imam **Islam Mossaad** of **North Austin Muslim Community Center** cited scriptures that urge the faithful to welcome the stranger, reciting a Quranic verse in Arabic; condemned current immigration policies as "discriminatory, xenophobic, and hateful"; and urged people of faith to speak out against injustice and act charitably.

In addition to speeches from faith leaders, five refugees from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Iraq, Myanmar, and Eritrea spoke at the vigil. All of them live in Austin.



The final speaker, **Tahaguas Abraha Haillemariam**, who was resettled in Austin last year, spoke about her childhood in Eritrea.

"I left home when I was 12 years old. I was [too] young to understand the social [and] political atmosphere of Eritrea, but I was not pardoned from the consequences of oppression and the atrocities that were being inflicted upon Eritrean people."

Tahaguas spent the next seven years living as an unaccompanied minor in a refugee camp in Ethiopia, sharing a tent with eight other girls. Just when she had finally been reunited with her brother, she was told that she would not be able to take him with her when she emigrated to the U.S. He is currently alone in a refugee camp in Ethiopia. On Jan. 31, the Trump administration expanded its notorious **Muslim ban** to suspend permanent immigration visas for citizens of Nigeria, Kyrgyzstan, Myanmar (Burma), and Tahaguas' native Eritrea.

"I have been trying to bring my brother to safety here in America. I [heard] last Friday they had just put a bar on my people. My people need your help. ... My little brother needs your help. Please don't forget it." – Francesca D'Annunzio

The Institution Theater Is the Next to Close

Add the Institution Theater to the roster of arts venues that are going away due to what's popularly called "market forces." You know: where a city does so well, due in part to the creative scene flourishing among its population, that the resultant success drives that creative scene elsewhere because the artists and organizations involved can't afford the real estate anymore?

Like, "Hi-ho, capitalism, away!" as some loan arranger might put it.

The Institution, started by Tom Booker and Asaf Ronen back in 2011, has been a mainstay of the local improvised theatre community – one of the so-called Five Families of Austin Improv – presenting its own diverse schedule of shows, leasing stage space to other performance companies, and offering a rich slate of classes in improv, stand-up comedy, on-camera auditioning, and more. All of that's ending at the end of March. And how does Booker feel about this?

"Oh, it's kind of bittersweet," says the affable teacher, who in 2007 ditched the L.A. actor's grind for a gentler life in Austin. "I understand why we can't be here anymore, but it's a bummer. What's weird to me is that we started with renting just this run-down warehouse that we cleaned up a corner of, and the landlord was sort of, 'Do whatever you want – just pay your rent and don't bother me.' But now we're priced out by a company that was able to raise \$90 million to make grainfree chips. And that seems like the story of Austin, the story of Austin in general, over the past eight years.

"So I'm bummed, but I'm also excited – because now it's someone else's turn, you know? When I started 30 years ago, it was my turn. And now – and hopefully it'll be someone who studied at the Institution – maybe someone



Local Aussie Rallies for Fire Relief

Cutout glossy images of wallabies, koalas, and other Aussie critters lined the walls at **Cheer Up Charlies** last Sunday night. Local **Go Fever** frontwoman **Acey Monaro**, a booker at the venue under the banner of **Planet Claire Presents**, organized the 10-act benefit while watching wildfires ravage her home country.

"Every morning, it was the first thing I saw on my social media," explains Monaro. "I didn't realize how much it was affecting me. While crying in the bathtub, I shot off an email to some bands. I thought maybe one or two would get back to me, but every single person said, 'Yes."

Pro bono turnout resulted in intimate sets from established Austin acts like **American Sharks** and **Matthew Logan Vasquez** in a precautionary rain tent on the venue patio. Since now-New York-based guitarist **Andrew Cashen** was in town, **Sweet Spirit** reprised a rowdy performance by **A Giant Dog** the night before. **Wild Child** singer **Kelsey Wilson**'s solo project **Sir Woman** offered dance-friendly, R&B-styled cuts off an upcoming debut. She later reemerged to sing with Vasquez on "Heatstroke," a song from their all-star side project **Giorietta**.

Indoors, Go Fever covered **Dead Kennedys**' "Moon Over Marin," described onstage by its singer as "a song about dickheads who fuck over the environment – like your government and my government." Monaro worked for environmental nonprofits in Australia and zeroed in on **First Nations Communities of Australia** and **Hunter Wildlife Rescue** as beneficiaries of all concert proceeds. The latter works out of the **Hunter Valley** region, where Monaro was raised in the city of **Maltland**.

"A lot of the bushfire that was wiped out goes right up to the edge of where my mum lives," adds Monaro. "I had friends who just had to sit there with their cars packed, ready to go, not knowing whether to take their kids to school. It was really scary." - Rachel Rascoe will be inspired enough to open up their own space somewhere else. Like I was, by a guy named Mick Napier at the Annoyance Theatre in Chicago. And *he'd* been inspired by Charna Halpern and the people at Second City."

But does this shuttering put a final kibosh on the Institution's esteemed educational programs? For good an' all?

"Well, we're a four-level program," notes Booker. "And right now we have two Level One classes, two Level Twos, and one Level Three. So one of the things I might do, at the very least, is keep the classes going to allow those students to complete the full program. I'm looking around for somewhere that could allow that – there's a potential opportunity with Orf Brewing and their recently enlarged space. And then, after that, we'll see what happens. But, ah, I think it's time for me to do something a little more ... responsible? More *financially* responsible." He smiles wistfully. "I guess you can't be a bohemian forever." – *Wayne Alan Brenner*

Ozzy Osbourne, Trent Reznor, Janelle Monáe All Announced for SXSW 2020

If we told you that a prince were coming to **South by Southwest**, you'd probably guess Harry. More exciting, the conference rolls out the red carpet for the Prince of Darkness, **Ozzy Osbourne**.

The proto-metal wild man, now 71, arrives with a hefty promotional agenda. His new album, *Ordinary Man*, arrives Feb. 21 (although locals can hear it a day early if they get some Ozzy ink at **Resurrection Tattoo**), and SXSW 2020 will see the premiere of his new A&E doc, *Biography: The Nine Lives of Ozzy Osbourne*, directed by R. Greg Johnston. The Black Sabbath frontman recently revealed his diagnosis last year of Parkinson's disease, a central nervous system disorder that impacts motor skills. The Ozzman will officially appear in a Featured Speaker Session along with his son **Jack Osbourne** and comedian **Jim Norton**.

This week's massive programming announcement for the conference and festival, which runs March 13-22, also included news that Nine Inch Nails leader and former Apple Music executive **Trent Reznor** will be making his first ever SXSW appearance alongside bandmate **Atticus Ross**; they'll be discussing their work on HBO's **The Watchmen** with director **Damon Lindelof**.

Also coming from the crossroads of music and cinema, meta doc *The Nowhere Inn*. Reportedly, the film tracks musician **St. Vincent** hiring friend **Carrie Brownstein** of *Portlandia* and Sleater-Kinney fame to make a documentary about her, so the two singer/guitarists fly to Austin to screen and discuss the film. And director **Spike Jonze** will premiere a film about his greatest muses, the **Beastle Boys**, before the doc's Apple TV+ drop in April.

More programming additions include keynotes from musician/actress/activist Janelle Monáe and South Korean music mogul, producer, and former singer Lee Soo-man; Roger Waters in conversation with filmmaker Michael Moore; Judd Apatow in conversation with Stephen Colbert; Kenya Barris and Rashida Jones sneaking their new Netflix series *#blackexcellence*; political theorist Noam Chomsky; mad-smart comedians Desus and Mero; actor Jason Segel; and Wu-Tang chef Raekwon. – Kevin Curtin







ZooKeeper's Sophia the sloth is torpidly glad to see you **BY WAYNE ALAN BRENNER**

That creature in the large cage? The one you can see through the front window of the exotic pet store near the southeast corner of Burnet and Research? That's a sloth, that creature – a slow-moving, tropical American mammal that uses long limbs and hooked claws to hang upside down from the branches of trees. And her name is Sophia.

But Sophia isn't *just* a sloth, please note: She's a *rescue* sloth.

"She was a rescue that we got from a student at UT," says David Moellendorf, longtime manager at Austin's ZooKeeper Exotics. "The student, for whatever reason, thought she was getting a pocket pet – a small animal which would fit in a pocket. Which, obviously, Sophia is not. And when we got her, she was already full-grown and was being kept in a birdcage that was not very large. And since we got her, she's much healthier – and of course, we built this big cage for her to live in."

Sophia's been at ZooKeeper for a while now, providing the bustling store with a sort of built-in mascot. "We've had her around 20 years," says Moellendorf, "but I'm not sure I can remember exactly. And people do come in just to see her. Even after we close, and sometimes before we open, people will stop by to look through the window at her."

Another thing that you should know about Sophia is that she, this lanky length of mammalian fur and lethargy, has a pet of her own: Sophia the sloth has a pet iguana. The current iguana, which has no name (unless Sophia's given it one that only she knows), lives with Sophia, sharing space in the roomy cage, generally keeping her company. And ... cuddling?

Well, maybe not actually cuddling.

"I don't know how true this is *elsewhere*," says Moellendorf, "but iguanas generally snort all the extra salt and minerals out of their nose – and it crystallizes on their nose. And the iguana will go up to the sloth and the sloth will hook the iguana close and lick its nose. So it's like Sophia has a giant salt lick in there with her. Whether that happens in the wild, I can't say – but it happens *here*."

(Brief pause while we try to decide if the idea of a sloth licking the crystallized salt off an iguana's nose is cute or gross.)

While keeping in mind that the staff at the always-busy ZooKeeper also accommodates the needs of many large snakes, lizards, turtles, frogs, and so on – that they make sure a multispecies multitude of tarantulas and scorpions and millipedes and other such varmints are as comfortable as they are creepy – we ask Moellendorf what it's like caring for a sloth.

"Oh, she's easy," says the affable manager, "but she's a diva. She'll throw a temper tantrum if food's not on time."

And, ah, what exactly does that look like in a sloth? Is it a sort of *slow-motion* tantrum?

Moellendorf chuckles. "It's faster than you think," he says. "And she'll come down from her tree and pick up the iguana's food bowl, and she'll carry it around at the front of the glass for us to look at. Or she'll grab the food that we give her, and she'll sniff it, and if it's not to her liking, she'll throw it in the pond."

So, Sophia's got her own pond and catered food *and* a pet iguana? No wonder she's such a contented creature these days. And always there in ZooKeeper's front window, citizen – for you to have a sloth-affirming look at in the midst of your, we're assuming, somewhat busier life.

eonardo had his Mona Lisa. John Singer Sargent had his Madame X. Grant Wood had his American Gothic couple. And Greg Geisler has his El Sam.

Unlike those older masterworks of portraiture, Geisler's has no mystery in its subject's expression; it leaves the viewer with no questions. Indeed, that's what makes it so special, so compelling. We know precisely El Sam's state of mind. The large ears are relaxed, flopping ever so slightly. The mouth is open just enough to reveal the wide pink tongue pushed against the prominent lower canines, and its corners are pulled back in an obvious smile. Everything in its appearance says "friend," and the big eyes – those *eyes*, so bright and alive – are trained right on you, the viewer, with that look of unconditional affection seen only in dogs.

Oh, yes, El Sam is a dog, and just one of many that Geisler has painted in the past two decades. This Austin artist has made a specialty of pooch portraits, and scrolling through his extensive portfolio, it's apparent that he's become an Old Master of them. Geisler captures not only the features in fine detail – the color and texture

of the fur, the stray wire whiskers, the play of light on the dark nose – but also the personality – in the tilt of the head, the set of the mouth, the angle of the ears, and the eyes, the eyes that always look like those of a living being.

Some of Geisler's evocation of personality comes from his fidelity to the source. He makes sure to have a photo of the pet that he's painting. "The better the photo, the better the outcome," Geisler says. "Animals can look generic, but if the client has a photo, that pose and expression resonates and is familiar to them. I pay close attention to the eyes and the expression. I love animals, dogs in particular, and I try to represent their soul."

The rest of his success can be attributed to Geisler's years of training and experience as an artist. He's something of a jack-ofall-trades in the field: commercial illustration, poster design, logo design, website design, woodworking. He makes birdhouses, custom keepsake boxes, and human portraits, too. His dog portraits are frequently made on reclaimed wood with a woodburning tool, colored pencils, and stains. He'd gotten into woodburning a few decades ago - "I liked the idea of making lines without paint, burning into

reclaimed wood to make more of an object than a drawing" – but it grew into a passion about 16 years ago.

That's about the same time he did his first dog portrait: a woodburned image of a friend's Boston terrier. "I still have it, and it is crude compared to my later portraits," Geisler says. But it prompted his wife to suggest that other people would love to have custom portraits of their pets, so he launched his own Etsy shop, Wounded Wood.

Now, pet portraits are a major part of his work. He's done cats, birds, the odd llama, but mostly it's been dogs. They may be wearing derbies or suits, but most often the dogs are just themselves, looking like we love them to look, as we know them. The work has become meaningful to Geisler: "Of all the art I have ever done, doing pet portraits has been the most satisfying because of how moved people are when they receive them. Most of them are memorial portraits, and the experience of seeing the customer in tears is the best thing that I could possibly hope for. All of my other artistic endeavors pale in comparison."

He's Just Not That Into Mew

Everything I know about rejection I learned from my cats

I love my cats – I just wish the feeling were mutual.

You see, I'm being totally ostracized by the three furry little beings who I share a home with. When I return from a long day away and I crouch down on the floor and call their names, they walk past me like I'm invisible. On the couch, I pet them, and they get up and leave. If ever I lean in to smooch their heads, they shrink back in disgust as if I'm a leper.

Sometimes when I'm laying down, one will jump on the bed and my heart will swell. Then it'll climb over me like I'm an inanimate sack of sand and drink from the glass on my nightstand. I'm lucky if it doesn't bat the cup over and spill water all over me before leaving.

I'm not asking for a lap cat, but it would be nice to be regarded.

Cheeto, Giblet, and Maus: Don't you know that I clean up your shit? I buy your food – the good stuff! I even got you that adorable scratching post that looks like a saguaro cactus ... ah, you just played in the box it came in.

I love you unendingly, and still you respond with wholesale indifference. So why do I think so highly of things that don't give a damn about me? Is it because I hate myself? No. It's because love doesn't have to be mutual for it to be real. I love my cats, not because they're in contract to love me back but because they're amazing little creatures with highly individual personalities. In fact, the only thing they really have in common is that they all think I suck. I don't hold that against them. I've learned: Those who reject you aren't bad. There's power in that. Getting used to dealing with rejection strengthens us, and cats are good practice for low-stakes rejection because they don't impact your dignity in any visible way – as long I continue wearing long sleeves to hide the scratch marks.

Rabbits (Finally) at Rest

Two warring bunnies defy the odds to love each other, and so should we all BY JOSH KUPECKI

There's a certain tenacity at play in the world these days. It's one that can become quite clear if you follow certain internet avenues of politics, or even celebrity worship. (What else does one do on the internet? Perhaps look up symptoms for a fatal disease? Purchase shoes or furniture?) And while that tenacity of thought, of reason, and of idiocy can be seen far and wide, I will highlight a microcosm of it as I describe the bonding of two of our house rabbits.

Pet bonding either goes great, or it goes sideways. That applies to dogs and cats living together, goats and chickens finding their respective spaces, or in this particular instance bonding two female rabbits – which, to be clear, is one of the most difficult things perhaps on the planet, barring convincing certain people that climate change is real. But we're here to talk about bunnies, cute little rabbits who can be cruel and vicious. Which is where we start. There's Nigel, a rabbit who has had free roam in her territory in the house for two years, and also happens to be deaf. Enter Saoirse, a sweet-natured, one-eyed mutt who just wants to be loved. They loathed each other.

We made myriad attempts: enclosing them in the bathroom, putting them together in a pen outdoors, and generally having them together in a heightened environment – the car, protracted sequestering on the bed in the bedroom. There is nothing quite like pulling apart two animals who concretely want to kill each other. It was unnerving, because it spoke viscerally and metaphorically to opposition. They were fur tornadoes of conflict that were epic and scary. It was fascinating and frightening at the same



time, these two creatures completely at odds with each other. Why couldn't they just get along? It was incredibly vexing. Seven months later, though, it happened. They became friends. This long journey of trying to bond these animals had finally, through so many frustrating turns (again: *it took seven months*), begat a friendship. They loved each other. Saoirse, so earnest and loving, who just wanted affection. Nigel, the quintessential loner who finally acquiesces to companionship. And then they became more friendly to us, more playful and sprightly. It was marvelous to see this hard-fought battle over, if only to not have to ever wonder again who would murder the other. (It would probably have been Nigel in that particular *Clue* game, in the litter box, baring teeth.)

These animals offer up an interesting Hegelian take on the master and servant dialectic. But it moves beyond that, especially when the human element is involved. We become friends with our animals, they provide an unconditional love that transcends the demands of "feed me" or "pet me." These animals who we share our lives with, who we, yes, bond with, aid in our navigating the world. They provide comfort and solace in these increasingly conflicting times. We have bonded with them, and if we could

perhaps bond somehow with each other, maybe this incessant cacophony would diminish. Think of Nigel and Saoirse, two beings who hated each other upon first encounters, but ended up best friends forever (eventually). James Herriot has an oft-quoted line from his classic *All Creatures Great and Small*: "If having a soul means being able to feel love and loyalty and gratitude, then animals are better off than a lot of humans." We would do well to heed those words. No matter our dif-

ferences, animal to animal, animal to human, or human to human, the bonds of friendship and understanding matter a lot more than any particular ideology.

Although I suspect that Saoirse may be a Libertarian.



My Black Widow

She does, you know, whatever a spider can

Latrodectus mactans. That's the Latin name, the name that scientists use, for a black widow spider. My own Latrodectus mactans is named Erzsébet.

I named her after Erzsébet Báthory, of course, after that 16th-century Hungarian noblewoman and reputed serial killer. I named my black widow that because such a lethality-associated tag seemed appropriate for a small and pretty creature whose venom is, as they say, medically significant.

But Erzsébet has been the easiest and most rewarding pet I've yet had, arthropodwise, and I, uh, listen: I've had a fuckton of arthropods as pets over the years. I've kept scorpions and tarantulas and millipedes and hissing cockroaches and vinegaroons and tailless whip scorpions and – there've been a lot of various bugs in my life thus far, is my point. And all of those arthropods have been easier to deal with, on a taking-care-of-daily-needs basis, than any of the cats or dogs or snakes I've lived with. And – since I got her from my mad roboticist friend Brooks Coleman, who lives in a ramshackle DIY bunker in some far boondocks of the Texas Hill Country – the potentially deadly Erzsébet has been the easiest of all.

My black widow lives in a tall (and lidded) glass vase that's got a couple of sticks sticking up from the base of it – the better for her to weave her chaotic patterns of webbing. And once a week, I give her a live cricket and spritz her web with a bit of water. And that's it. No, really: That's all I do. For two years now -Latrodectus mactans typically live for one to three years - that's all I ever have to do, and there inside a transparent vase atop one of my home office's bookcases is a black widow spider, looking as gorgeous as only that ebony-hued species with the bold red hourglass on its abdomen's underside can look. Erzsébet is typically hanging out and looking like a living gem, or fussing with her structures of

web, or capturing and killing and devouring a cricket in a compelling microspectacle of Nature's Inherent Savagery, and generally providing all the visual beauty of a darkly flowering plant – but with magnitudes more biological complexity and fascinating kinesis. What's not to love?

And maybe I shouldn't recommend such a creature as a pet. Because there's always some idiot who will want to, like, *play* with their pet *L. mactans* and take her out of her home and accidentally pinch her the wrong way, and then she bites them, and they have to spend a night in the hospital and suffer ridiculous health care costs to make sure they don't experience cardiac breakdown due to neurotoxins defensively introduced into the ol' idiotic bloodstream.

But not everybody is an idiot. And all sorts of people have all sorts of pets. I mean, Russia's Vladimir Putin has his own pet Trump, right? So maybe you should consider a creature that's much less obnoxious and horrifying, that's less destructive to the environment, and that has nothing in common with Nazis other than a distinctive red-and-black color scheme? I'm just saying.



Understanding Austin's Urban Livestock Rules

Hog heaven? Mini-pony paradise? It's your backyard. BY KEVIN CURTIN

Here's something that might surprise you: Mini-ponies make eager and unflagging jogging companions. Running with a dog is fine, but a bit basic if you're trying to live your most exceptional pet life. Just imagine how good it'd feel to lace up your New Balances and go dashing down your neighborhood street with Li'l Seabiscuit trotting along next to you.

Having a tiny horse-friend remains a life goal for many of us, but is it even possible while living inside Austin's city limits? You bet it is, buckaroo! Here's the lay of the land on Austin's miniature livestock regulations.

You can have two miniature-bred beasts – each weighing up to 200 pounds. They just need to be kept in sanitary, adequately sized enclosures at least 10 feet from neighboring houses or businesses, excluding your own home, and, if they're males, they need to be neutered. If your micro-menagerie is more than two but fewer than six, they need to be kept 50 feet from the nearest house. More than six? Now they need to be penned 100 feet from the nearest habitation.


The most notable denizen of Austin's inner-city livestock community was Nik (pictured), a hairy, horned billy goat who lived on the corner of South Congress Avenue and West Mary Street from around 2002-2012. Noting the 200-pound restriction, I called an Austin-area mini-pony seller and asked how much theirs weigh, full grown. They told me it's a wide range, but average about 185 pounds. Sounds like a yard-pony is quite feasible, aside from two important hurdles: They're kind of expensive, and they live 25-35 years.

If you don't have enough bread in the bank to live out your Hobbit fantasies with a mini-pony, might I interest you in a pot-bellied pig? You can usually find one for free on Craigslist.

If you've ever read George Orwell's *Animal Farm*, you know these oinkers thrive in leadership roles. They're also heavy, but luckily there's plenty of minibreeds that'll meet the 200-pound weigh-in, including pot-bellies and colorful Juliana pigs. Before you go whole hog, realize: Pigs need considerable help to beat the heat, and

If you'd like an animal companion that pulls its own weight by providing milk and mowing the lawn, you can find a variety of miniature sheep and goat breeds. In fact, if you want a bigger goat, the current city code allows for one non-miniature-breed livestock animal if it weighs less than 200 pounds – again, 10 feet away from the nearest house.


The most notable denizen of Austin's inner-city livestock community was Nik, a full-sized goat who lived on the corner of South Congress and West Mary Street from around 2002-2012. The hairy, horned billy goat with an affinity for french fries became such a celebrated beacon of Austin weirdness that he got featured in a community play and won a "Best of Austin" award from the *Chronicle* in 2005. That same year, Mayor Will Wynn publicly pardoned Nik for violating Austin's code regarding livestock in relation to neighboring residences.

That's the other side of Austin's livestock laws: If your barnyard buddy is full-sized – like a longhorn named Hornboi or a donkey named Mrs. Teeth – city regulations say their enclosures need to be "at least 100 feet from adjoining residentially zoned property and at least 50 feet from a residential structure." The same goes if you have six or more mini-livestock, any un-neutered males, or if your miniature breed weighs over 200 pounds.

Run afoul of these rules and your neighbors can call authorities – that's what prompts most code violations since there's no regular patrol of urban livestock enclosures. According to Austin 311, there have been an average of 234 loose animal service requests annually relating to cows, goats, pigs, horses, and sheep – in that order of occurrence – over the last five years. Keep in mind, that data covers all of Austin, not differentiating inner- and outer-city limits. During that same time, there were considerably fewer service calls related to complaints about animal enclosures: 13 for horses, 12 for goats, and 8 for pigs.

Being that standard single-family lots in Austin span about 50 feet wide, most Austinites don't have the space to legally keep full-size livestock, but if you have an extra-large lot or you live at the end of a street, I think I know just the animal for you: a mini-cow.

The 500-800 pound chillers have countless upsides: They're fuzzy, they're gentle and friendly, they've got big cute eyes, they give you milk, and they can be used for therapy. Not only that, but if America's food supply were interrupted, a single miniature cow could reportedly feed a family for four months ... which reminds me, it's also illegal to slaughter livestock in residential areas.

Two Pups, One Austin Chef

Nutrient-dense ready-to-eat dog food could help alleviate dogs' symptoms and finicky habits

My boxer, Chuck, loves to eat. But between her allergies and the cat's own separate set of health issues, we find our little menagerie at the vet's office far more often than we'd like – a recurring ear infection, an ulcer on the lip, constant paw-licking and chin-scratching. My editor reports that

although her senior dog is the mark of good health, he's perhaps the single most finicky canine on the planet: Jim won't even eat a piece of perfectly mid-rare New York strip straight from the dinner table. Or chicken. Or lunch meat. Or anything aside from his one specific food, and only when it's been sitting out for awhile. Balancing a dog's eating habits with personalized health needs is no easy feat, and one local human chef-turnedpet chef knows the struggle all too well.

Gregory Purnell, a chef for more than 30 years, and his wife Nikki started a local dog food company – Your Pets' Chef – last summer after getting recipe feedback from their own pups. "Our Boerboel [a South African Mastiff] has allergies, and he was really suffering. My wife, Nikki, started looking into the ingredients in kibble. We had tried just about everything, and it just

wasn't giving him any relief. So we started researching cooking our own food for our dogs. My wife researched what natural ingredients benefit dogs; I created the recipes and prepared the food. This entire venture started because we wanted our dogs to get the most nutrition they could through diet," Purnell said.

Chuck couldn't stay seated once I'd opened the Your Pets' Chef meal package, and she pushed her bowl across the room in her effort to eat every bite.

Their business focuses on well-balanced, health-focused dog food made from human-grade ingredients like garbanzo beans, brown rice, beef tripe, blackberries, basil, and even marine microalgae. And because balance is essential, they've intentionally worked to ensure that all of the meal options – think chicken in gravy – meet the Association of American Feed Control Officials (AAFCO) guidelines for Growth/All Life Stages. "Our dogs were doing so well on the food. Our Boerboel's allergies improved immensely, and our senior chihuahua's digestive issues are near nonexistent," Purnell added. "We've met quite a few people who do cook for their dogs. However, it's very time-consuming. This is where we come in – let us do the work for you and become Your Pets' Chef."

> The Austinites soon realized they had to share the food with all the animal lovers in town, but knew that convenience would be essential for making an easy transition from regular feeding routines. Your Pets' Chef provides several different protein-included meals, and the food is delivered to pet owners' doorsteps ready to eat. Prices vary based on pupper size

and shipment frequency, but with options at 1.64 per day, it's priced lower than many gournet dog food alternatives.

Chuck couldn't stay seated once I'd opened the Your Pets' Chef meal package, and she pushed her bowl across the room in her effort to eat every bite. With ground turkey and chicken gizzards as the first ingredients, I wouldn't expect anything less. As for sweet, strange Jim, the verdict – and the food – is still out.


Zach Theatre's *Every Brilliant Thing* gives its audience a reason to live – make that a million reasons

Do laundry. Wash the car. Pick up some beer. No doubt these items or some like them have been on a list you've made of tasks that need attending to. Who hasn't made a to-do list?

But have you ever made a to-*live* list? That would be an inventory of those things – objects, observations, experiences – that are so pleasurable, so satisfying, so sweet, they make life worth living, make a body *want* to live.

At the heart of this solo show by Duncan Macmillan (with Jonny Donahoe) is someone who made such a list. And he had good cause: to give his mother reasons not to end her life. After she'd made her first attempt at suicide, he thought that if he could give her a list of all that was wonderful in the world – "every brilliant thing," as he puts it – she'd never be tempted to try again. Of course, he was all of 7 at the time and had no grasp of depression or other pressures that might lead a person down that dark path. All he knew was it made sense to him, so he threw himself into the project, full of hope. The initial list reflected his age – "1) Ice cream, 2) Water fights, 3) Staying up past your



bedtime and being able to watch TV" – but as later experiences in life led him to keep expanding the list, items such as "laughing so hard you shoot milk out of your nose" and "kind old people who aren't weird and don't smell" gave way to "knowing someone well enough to have them check your teeth for broccoli" and "making up after an argument." The show is his account of how the list grew, and why and what was in it. Only our narrator doesn't just want to tell us his story: He wants to *involve* us in it. Before the show, he hands out numbered cards to assorted attendees so that later, when he says a number on the list, the person with that numbered card can call out "Bubble Wrap" or whatever the item is. (Mine was "1008) Dancing in private.") He also gently recruits folks to stand in for people in his past: the vet who euthanized his dog, his father, the woman he fell for in college. We're always *invited* into the story, our participation *solicited* with the warmth and deference of an old friend asking a favor. At least that's how it feels with Kriston Woodreaux in Zach Theatre's production. The actor is welcoming and cordial, always with a laugh at hand, his pale blue cotton shirt and jeans (supplied by costume designer Christina Montgomery) setting a casual tone. Turning him down would be like refusing to help a pal set up for a party.

And in some ways this production feels like a party, since so many audience members join in. Even as the story turns dark through a marital split and questions of mental health, we stay with Woodreaux's unnamed narrator, still contributing to the list, still stepping in to be the people meaningful in his life. His journey remains something we share in – in the communal way that guests do. That is in part owing to the, pardon the term, brilliant way Macmillan's script is built, but it's

the idea that suicide is contagious, that when a person taking their own life is reported or talked

about or just made the subject of a book or play or film and it spreads through the public consciousness, a spike in suicides follows. What *Every Brilliant Thing* does is expose its audience to those aspects of life that fill our existence with pleasure, with joy, with wonder. It sends us from the theatre filled with reasons to live. In doing so, this play may also be creating something contagious: an embrace of life and all that makes it worth living.

Memory can be overwhelming, powerful – a force to be reckoned with. In the solo exhibition "Soaked," artist Mihee Nahm grapples with the power of memory through nature. Her exquisite paintings capitalize on small scenes collected through her walks. She lays a moment out on canvas or paper, and we complete it with our own experiences.

Nahm's paintings raise an intensely sensory feeling. Standing in front of a duo of leaf-covered canvas (*Submerged*), my nose prickles with the rich scent of rotting leaves and compressed earth, autumn in muted brown and gold. In certain landscapes of rocks and rivers, I can feel the wind sweeping down creek beds, taste the dusty earth whipping around me. "Landscape itself

allows me to drift into a peaceful, calm state," Nahm has stated about her work, and it's not a difficult jump for someone to join her in that nirvanic realm.

The pieces, starkly displayed on four walls of Women & Their Work's gallery, range from large canvas triptychs to grids of small paintings. You walk from Wall A to D, turning

through four corners, four phases of Nahm's work. The earliest pieces display collections. Here are leaves pinned to paper, gathered in plastic bags, spare and delicately detailed crispy leaf edges, shiny crinkles in plastic bags, dripping water creating a dark stain down the canvas. Wall B is a stunning grid of sparsely framed papers. Nahm calls these untitled works the first step in her process, scenes captured from photos of her outings. Each rectangle serves as a swim through memory. Like old slide shows, the scenes take you headfirst into the moment: Piled up pine trees offer the spice of Christmas tree shopping, a dark square shows the moonlight glinting off rustling leaves, rocky shores betray the lap of water as it meets the rocks.

The final two walls are the most experimental of her offerings. Nahm, who recently returned to Texas and creating art after working in Korea, says that her style goal was to "loosen up," and it's easy to see her getting bigger with ideas (and not just based on canvas scale alone). The intense detail of her early works and first impressions makes way for more ethereal space. One wall centerpiece, a three-canvas vertical called *Earth Water*, starts with perfectly rendered rocks drifting upward, morphing as

> ghostly spiked branches rise from water. Here, solid earth evaporates into misty eddies, and her details become gentle brushstrokes. The scene drifts away, perhaps further into the annals of memory.

The combination of natural focus and pure size in her more recent pieces transition Nahm's artistic goal from mere recreation

to a narrative space. Instead of relying on shared memory, there's now a mystery that pulls at the viewer. While not as nostalgia-evoking as the first-stage paintings or the expressionistic scenes of rocks and water, these works still leave the viewer with an imprint of earth and vegetation, and perhaps, something more. A journey into the synapses where memory resides? A promise of discovering our own buried hopes and joys? It's possible. – *Cat McCarrey*





"No one knew the story of Elsa Weiss." But how do you go about defining the life of someone who spends much of her existence trying to be undefinable – invisible, if you will?

A person who is largely an enigma in her professional life and a virtual cipher in her private affairs? An individual whose inability to forge any kind of meaningful relationships fuels a crippling loneliness? Indeed, on the first page of this haunting novel by Israeli author Michal Ben-Naftali, which won that nation's prestigious Sapir Prize in 2016 and has been newly translated and published by the University of Rochester's Open Letter press, we learn that high school teacher Elsa Weiss has "jumped to her death from her rooftop apartment." We come to find out that

she was a Holocaust survivor living in Tel Aviv. But we'll discover that her experiences are in important ways different from the typically harrowing Holocaust narratives we've read over the decades.

Weiss' story is partially told, 30 years hence, through the eyes of an undisclosed student who speaks from seemingly firsthand, observational



knowledge of being in class with this cold, aloof, gray-clad taskmaster. But when this student tries to imagine and piece together the particulars of what might have actually happened in Ms. Weiss' younger life, she readily admits that her speculation is purely fiction. That said, the narrator crafts a gripping story-within-a-story of Weiss' pre-war life in Budapest with her family

gripping story-within-a-story of e in Budapest with her family and husband, the German invasion of Hungary in 1944, the family's subsequent deportation via cattle car to Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, Weiss' transfer to Switzerland, and her ultimate migration to Palestine.

We find out late in the game that Weiss' transit to Switzerland was aboard the historically accurate Kastner train, by which a pre-arranged agreement with the Nazis saved 1,600 Jews from the gas chambers. Years later, however, this would become a huge controversy in the new state of Israel and a real source of survivor's guilt for Weiss as family members

had perished in the camps. The incident also helped to crystallize a steadfast resistance to authority that would stay with Weiss to the end.

Ultimately, perhaps, the story is a parable of how uncontrollable events on the world stage affect one particular individual, an individual with an overriding desire to navigate her constricted world in virtual anonymity. *– Jay Trachtenberg*





Collective Hill Country outside of Wimberley celebrates the outdoors without sacrificing creature comforts. From a small porch outside the flaps of their private safari-style canvas tent, guests have a grand view of the Blanco River Valley.

Opened in 2017, the 12 tents at the retreat each have a king-sized bed, shower, and bathroom, and at 440 square feet, plenty of room to stretch out if you're not relaxing on the porch.

A wood-fired stove gives the tent a campfire smell while keeping the canvas-walled room toasty. If that's not enough, an electric heater and electric blanket fight off even the most severe Hill Country chill.

Josh Green, the assistant manager, says that some guests just hang out, and others use the retreat as a base camp. Austin, San Antonio, and Fredericksburg are an hour away, San Marcos less than 30 minutes.

If you decide to spend your entire time at the retreat, there is plenty to do. The staff can arrange horseback riding, electric bike rides, and farm tours. They can even prepare a s'mores cookout.

While breakfast is included, gourmet lunch and dinner can be arranged. The kitchen staff will prepare picnic lunches to take on expeditions around the Hill Country.

The Collective has similar retreats in Vail, Colo.; in Montana near Yellowstone National Park; and at New York's Hudson Valley and Governor's Island.



Collective Hill Country Retreat is less than 15 minutes outside of Wimberley. The tents, which include a honeymoon suite and a family version with a separate tent for the kids, are for rent Thursday through Sunday nights. The retreat closes during the summer heat from May 27 to Labor Day. Well-behaved four-legged family members are welcome.

Review: Yak & Yeti

The Tibetan dumplings shine at this Nepalese restaurant in Cedar Park **BY MELANIE HAUPT**

Sandwiched between northeast India and southwestern China is a tiny strip of land about the size of Arkansas – the country of Nepal. Home to Mount Everest, medieval cities, and sacred Buddhist monasteries, Nepal is a cultural gold mine with a very specific culinary tradition.

Sandwiched between a karate school and a paint-it-yourself pottery studio in a Cedar Park strip mall is a tiny restaurant with 11 tables. The decor is sparse and utilitarian,

although there are a few paintings of Buddhist temples and Himalayan peaks on the walls. Yak & Yeti's Indo-Nepalese menu showcases the complexities of the cuisine.

The food of Nepal is informed by specific cultural,

economic, and geographical forces. Because it's situated in the Himalayas, agricultural output is primarily crops like buckwheat, millet, high-altitude rice, and potatoes. The cold climate translates into hearty soups and stews with hardy ingredients like lentils and starches, and because about 80% of Nepalese people practice Hinduism, you won't find beef or pork on the menu. My first visit to Yak & Yeti (in the former Dolphin Indian Kitchen spot) was at the end of a very busy Saturday, when I was exhausted and wanted some warm, comforting curry. The restaurant was about half-full, and a friendly young man supervised the dining room, with a little help from another man who popped in and out of the kitchen occasionally.

I ordered far too much food for the family, starting with a pair of triangular vegan samosas heavily seasoned with coriander.

YAK & YETI www.yaknyeti.us Wed.-Mon., 11am-2pm (lunch buffet); 5-9:30pm (dinner) 200 Buttercup Creek Blvd. #125, Cedar Park My husband opted for saag paneer and chicken tikka masala, which were both on par with any of the big-name Indian restaurants in Austin. I chose the vegetarian Nepali khana set, a combo platter similar to an Indian thali,

served on a metal tray with separate bowls and compartments. The assortment included spicy-tart mustard greens and radish pickles (achar); a nutty yellow dal; aalo bodi tama, a traditional and somewhat sour curry of bamboo shoots, potatoes, and black-eyed peas; rice; and a cauliflower-potato curry. The flavors were spicy and bright, with less cumin and more cinnamon than I'm accustomed to.

Not sure if that met the comforting portion of the brief, but it was unique and delicious. (There's another combo plate on the menu called the Newari khaja set – the Newars are an ethnic group native to the Kathmandu Valley, known for their intense flavors. We did not try that one.)

We also tried the vegetable biryani – a bridge too far in terms of how much we could responsibly or comfortably eat – and we enjoyed the spicy rice, studded with chunks of potato, cauliflower, onions, and more. My only criticism of this dish was that the spices and seasonings were inconsistently dispersed throughout, with bits of unseasoned white rice here and there.

There's plenty here for (most) entry-level palates, too. My teen chose the chicken chow mein (an influence

from Chinese cuisine). It was snappy and salty, but not in a "I've had so much sodium I can see Jesus!" sort of way. My tween had rice. Can't win 'em all. I tried a few bites of kheer sweet rice pudding for dessert; again, it was comparable to other Indian restaurants around town.

I returned for midday lunch with a girlfriend, and we both opted for the lunch buffet, which, at \$11, is a reasonably priced, low-risk introduction to Nepalese food. The same friendly young man (who we learned is the owner of the restaurant) hovered around the sparsely populated dining room, offering drinks and fresh naan. We skipped over the chafing dish filled with baby carrots and tired cucumber slices, choosing instead to load our plates with the freshly made dishes, including a vegetable curry, a creamy and delicious dal makhani, and fragrant channa masala. The vegetable pakoras were delicious, but my friend's tandoori chicken was dry. She loved the spicy and crispy Chicken 65, despite the fact that it was lukewarm.

We capriciously decided to order a bit off the menu and decided on the sadheko momo, the Tibet-inspired dumplings that are a cornerstone of Nepalese cuisine. These were, hands down, the best thing I ate at Yak & Yeti. Eight dainty rice-paper purses are filled with peas, cauliflower, and cheese and steamed, then sunk into a bright tomato-based chili sauce and topped with fresh ginger, garlic, and cilantro. They're tart and just the right level of spicy. Perfect for

sharing ... or not.

We didn't try any dessert at lunch, apart from a few bites of the sooji (rava) laddu on the buffet. These mango-colored sweet balls are made with semolina flour (in this case, rava), sugar, and milk, fried, and then rolled in toasted coconut. Sadly, these weren't as flavorful as we'd hoped. I

very much enjoyed my mango lassi, though, which was sweet and nearly thick enough to be a milkshake.

If I lived in Cedar Park, Yak & Yeti would probably be my go-to when the family craves Indian/Nepalese food. Would I make a special trip (a half-hour drive from my home)? Probably not. But I'm certainly glad I discovered this tiny little shop in the northwest suburbs and expanded my horizons in the process.

Ecuadorian Family Makes Cedar Park a Chocolate Mecca

100% cacao bars and cognac bonbons are just the beginning BY JESSI CAPE

Carlos and Isabel Galarza are strengthening the connection between their family's cacao plantation in Ecuador and their Cedar Park chocolate shop, one bonbon at a time. Rosalba "Rosa" Aguilera, who works with the Galarzas, helped translate our conversation as Spanish is the primary language spoken at the Ecuadorian Chocolate Factory.

This unassuming-from-the-outside, familyowned business is tucked away in a strip mall just off of Bell Boulevard, near a nail salon and several restaurants. Inside it's sparsely decorated with black leather seating and black shelving that houses a range of available products, but behind the glass, the Galarza family handmakes every one of their bars and bonbons – and Carlos is especially excited to explain the process to any visitor willing to listen: "When people visit the shop, Carlos always gives a tour. Yes, [to] every person coming here, he tells the story and shows them how we make the chocolate."

As the story goes, Carlos and Isabel were visiting Austin from the Los Ríos province of Ecuador and met Aguilera, who was driving for Uber at the time. She says they mentioned wanting to start a business here but weren't sure when or how, and with three small girls, they needed to work out a plan. The Galarzas, in the corn and soybean business back home, kept in touch, and by the next trip, they'd enlisted Aguilera's help to find a spot for their chocolate business. She said, "It was a hard time since they didn't know anyone or have family here. That's part of the journey though – good times, bad times."

As for the chocolate itself, they made treats at home in Ecuador (not for commercial

sales, just for the family) using the family's cacao beans. All of the beans in the recipes for their shop, which opened just over a year ago, come from the family plantation. Their Pacific coastal farm - independently owned and operated within the family for many generations - uses no pesticides and is in the process of organic certification. Cacao, a fruit tree, has a flavor resembling mango, and as the factory's Instagram explains, "Its fleshy white pulp is crucial for the development of the flavor in the actual seed. The seeds are what make chocolate possible." They grow, harvest, toast, and peel the 100% natural grains, and after Carlos picks up the cacao nibs shipment straight from Ecuador, they're processed right there at Ecuadorian Chocolate on Bell Blvd. The short supply chain is evident in every tasty bite of the handmade chocolate.

Currently, the shop features bars with several percentages of pure cacao, as well as bonbons. All of the chocolate boasts no additives, colors, or preservatives, and it's made at a low temperature, which helps retain the naturally occurring antioxidants and minerals found in cacao. The bars are available in 100% (nothing added, pure cacao), 85% (15% sugar), 70%, 55%, and a new 90% version that might appeal to keto adherents. The pure cacao is the boldest flavor, but unlike many other brands' dark chocolate, it is surprisingly smooth with a well-balanced bitter note, a whisper of sweet earthiness, and a tiny bit of fruitiness that only happens with the farm-totable goods.

The bonbons – currently available in coffee, cognac, mint, and raspberry – have a sweeter 55% shell, and the Galarzas also mix dried fruits (apricot, kiwi, banana, pine-apple) with their 70% chocolate in other pieces. The shop features regular chocolate-making workshops for both children and adults – a great way to sample through the entire menu and decide on cacaopercentage preferences individually – plus wine pairing events. For Valentine's Day shoppers, they will have baskets, boxes, and chocolate-covered strawberries available. ■

Disney worldbuilders Jay Jackson and Brandon Jarratt explain the technology and art of *Frozen II*

Every time you see a snowflake in *Frozen II*, someone made it. Sometimes they are drawn by animators, but no one can illustrate every flake in a drift. So most are built by software, and there is just as much artistry in the computer tools as there is in the cartoonist's pen. Increasingly, the programmer and the illustrator are one and the same.

Jay Jackson is someone who straddles both worlds. As an environment look supervisor at **Disney Animation**, he's part of the asset department. "We build the characters and environments that get reused throughout the film," he explained. He'd already worked in the world of Elsa and Anna as a look development artist on the 2017 short "Olaf's Frozen Adventure," and for this return to Arendelle he was part of the team that created the environments and elements within a shot – the leaves, the trees, the spray from the sea. With *Frozen*

II, one of the first big challenges for that group was to create the enchanted forest – a massive new environment that had to feel like part of the same world, but also add something new and distinctive. "We'd try to push stuff, taking aspen trees and really, really stylize the texture, but then we had to pull back and

make them a little more realistic just to fit in that same world." Once the directors and producers were satisfied, "It was up to us to package that up and make it really easy to apply that similar palette and feeling."

Asset creation isn't the kind of work where you can point at a single character or shot and say Jackson did it, but instead his creativity is part of the world. "I feel really lucky to have worked on a good portion of it."

Cartoons have always been a technical endeavor. Remember the moment in *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs*, when the camera tracks through the illustrated forest like it was on a rail? It wouldn't have been possible if it hadn't been for Disney Technical Director William Garity's multiplane camera, a vast contraption that created layers and depth. Now the machinery is virtual and the images are digital, but for Jackson's fellow Texan and *Frozen II* Technical Director **Brandon Jarratt** the mindset is the same. "Being able to look at a problem, break it down into pieces and figure out how to address each piece and connect them together in order to solve the larger problem, that's what computer science is all about."

Jackson didn't exactly take the most traditional route to animation. A classroom doodler, he ended up studying human biology at **UT-Austin**. Even though he showed an interest in cinema (interning at **Austin Film Festival** in his senior year), his career track was medicine. However, there was a slight kink in his plan: He didn't like being in hospitals. From there he took an even

> more bizarre diversion, spending eight months as a market researcher for a nanotechnology energy company in China. If that seemed to be taking him ever further away from his doodling days, it turned out to simply be a circuitous route when he ran into an old friend from summer camp who was working

at **DreamWorks Animation**. "I was so fascinated, because I loved art and I loved film, but I never actually thought it was possible to work in that realm."

Before that conversation, Jackson had seen working in animation as "some dream job that other people could have, but talking to him it actually seemed possible." Now that friend recommended that he apply to the same school he had – **Texas A&M**, to take the Master of Fine Arts in visualization. So back to Texas Jackson came, taking a job as a plant genomics lab manager in College Station, assembling an art portfolio and a show reel for his college application.



Creating new realms beyond Arendelle for *Frozen II* required both artistry and technology, and Texans Jay Jackson and Brandon Jarratt provided both.

After being admitted and graduating with an MFA, he said, "I got an internship at Disney, and then an apprenticeship and now a full-time artist."

It was a similar roundabout story for Jarratt. As a kid growing up in Belton, Texas, his world changed when he saw the first Toy Story. "I loved animation and I loved computers, and this was those two things melded together in a perfect fusion." However, when he started thinking seriously about schools, he found out that there weren't many relevant degree programs, and the best one he could find was that A&M visualization MFA. Having studied computer science as an undergrad (he admits that it was his fallback, just in case he didn't get into the grad program), the appeal was that it was not built solely to produce filmmakers, but to immerse students from wide disciplines, from molecular modeling to game design, in the available tools: For example, architects use Esri CityEngine to build virtual concept models, but Jarratt and his team used it to lay out the wild and varied environment of Zootopia for the 2016 Disney film of the same name.

Moreover, it provided him with an in-road at Disney. Every year the department offers a summer industry course, in which animators work with a studio to make a 30-second short. "The year that I took that course happened to be the year that we were partnered with Disney Animation." That opportunity led to an internship, which led to him being hired by the House of Mouse. Seven years and counting as a technical director, with credits on *Big Hero 6*, *Moana*, *Ralph Breaks the Internet*, and another *Frozen* project, the 2015 short "Frozen Fever," and he sees the coding and project management skills he picked up in both the computer science and visualization courses as vital to his career trajectory. "Helping maintain and build tools for artists, looking at structures to make sure that all our data and all the performances our artists create, all our assets and the beautiful work that Jay does, gets out onto the screen the way that it's intended to be seen."

That's the real secret of animation: Storytellers have an impossible idea, and technicians make it possible. When it works, that's magic, and for Jarratt that idea is crystallized in one of the most important scenes in Frozen II: when Elsa finds Ahtohallan's ice cave of memories. "Nailing the look of that, and understanding what we would have to do in order to achieve that, was really hard. We didn't really know at first if we had the tools to do that." However, he only had to look as far as his last big project, Ralph Breaks the Internet. "The screen graphics pipeline that we built for that ended up working really well in creating these facets of the ice dome as screens that we could project these memories on. ... That was something I could point at and say, 'Hey, that's this cool problem I helped figure out.' Plus it was such an emotionally impactful moment in the film that, for me, it's something that I'm very proud of."

#MeToo drama The Assistant guietly point the fingers at the enablers – all of us **by marjorie baumgarten**

The #MeToo era has unleashed a tsunami of long-suppressed anger, voiced individually and collectively by victims of sexual exploitation in the workplace, particularly among women in the entertainment industries. Next. attention must shift to the enablers, the rank-and-file

workers who have kept their bosses' secrets, covered up the misdeeds, and contributed to systems that perpetuate the hierarchical wrongdoings while inculcating into new generations of workers their sense of status quo. Complicity is the offense

under investigation in The Assistant, the first fiction film of the #MeToo era that indicts the system along with its colluders, willing and unwilling.

The release of The Assistant during the weeks that the Harvey Weinstein trial is concurrently

The story, which is primarily set in a Tribeca film production office, features a boss (unseen, but whose muffled voice is frequently heard through closed doors and angry phone calls) who is a doppelgänger for Weinstein. This boss is not the subject of the film, however, but

instead his newest assistant Jane (Garner). It's a plum job that Jane (whose name I only learned from the press notes) has held for less than two months. At first, The Assistant seems like it's going to be a film in the Jeanne

Dielman mode, in which we observe the details of the monotonous daily routine carried out by the titular subject. In the pre-dawn hours, a car picks her up at her home in Queens to bring her to work, where she is the first to arrive and flick the lights on and start the coffee brewing. The day wears on as she makes countless copies, creates and adjusts travel arrangements, hedges on the phone to an angry wife about her boss' whereabouts, places cases of water bottles into the fridge, delivers lunch orders, tidies the office kitchen, and gets



chewed out by her boss and writes immediate apology letters for her "indiscretions."

The first sign that something is wrong occurs when she dons gloves to disinfect her boss' couch, then finds a bracelet on the floor. Later there's the box of syringes that arrive, and later, boxes of prescription drugs. Jane's tolerance for her boss' behavior comes to a bursting point after the arrival of a young waitress from Sun Valley, Idaho, who has been promised an assistant job by her boss. Jane accompanies the voung girl to a luxe Manhattan hotel and returns to find her boss absent. Taking her complaint to HR, Jane is adroitly foiled by the smiling cobra in charge (Macfadyen, brilliantly doing what he does best). Jane's day ends in the dark of evening, much as her morning had begun.

Making her feature debut after directing a couple of documentaries, Kitty Green sustains the

story's pressure-cooker feel throughout. Although Jane's great entry-level job comes with benefits and promises of a great future, the daily grind is full of tension and knowing collaboration in wrongdoing, a sickening mood heightened by the fluorescent green tinge that colors the proceedings. Yet Garner maintains her composure as the assistant with few tells into what she is inwardly thinking. Narratively, this perhaps aids viewers in putting themselves in Jane's place without skewing her reactions toward one direction or another. Personally, however, I found Jane's inactions disheartening, despite being 100% believable. One thing we have learned in these times of #ToughLove and #MeToo is that enablers are, indeed, part of the problem. As The Assistant points out, enablers, too, must take active parts in solving the problems of our times. ARBOR. VIOLET CROWN

After a terrible breakup with the Joker. Harley Quinn (Robbie) is stuck alone on the streets of Gotham City. Ousted from the protection of her ex. Ouinn finds herself in the crosshairs of every second-tier gangster and murderer she once mocked – including Roman Sionis (McGregor), the child of wealthy parents angling to create his own criminal empire. To survive Sionis, Quinn must defeat Sionis, and that will require the help of a few friends, including singer-with-a-secret Dinah Lance (Smollett-Bell) and vigilante Helena Bertinelli (Winstead).

With all due respect to Robert Downey Jr., there may be no better bit of superhero casting than Margot Robbie as Harley Quinn. In Birds of Prey, she is allowed to double-down on the best gualities of her lovable antihero. Robbie's Quinn is sexual but not objectified; eccentric but not

a caricature of mental illness: amoral without ever becoming immoral. Even her unreliable narration throughout the film - the narrative stops and starts that have been played to death in other action-comedies - feel like an essential part of her character development. How would you react if you, too, viewed the world through a kaleidoscope of spandex and concussions?

And while Birds of Prey is unequivocally her film to lead, Robbie is surrounded by a handful of dynamic actors in memorable roles. Christina Hodson has crafted a fantastic script, balancing a half-dozen characters without ever feeling like the film is overcrowded. What's more, by wisely choosing to stagger how the other Birds of Prey are introduced, Hodson can avoid the third-act fatigue that settles into so many other films. Right when we start to grow comfortable with Robbie or Rosie Perez's Renee Montoya, in swoops Winstead as the perpetually furious Huntress to give the movie one last jolt of energy to put it over the top. More screenwriters should learn to keep a superhero or two in reserve.

The steady across-the-board character work is essential to the film's success, as Birds of Prev has no interest in compromising either its cartoonish energy or its surprising amount of violence. This is a film where a dead character has his detached face thrown at his wife in a scene that is played for laughs – laughs that the scene successfully earns, I might add. Yan and Robbie lean into both sides of Quinn's personality throughout the film. This allows Birds of Prey to earn every bit of its R-rating while still feeling like a Looney Tunes cartoon.

None of this suggests that Birds of Prey transcends the conventions of the superhero genre. There are origin stories, there are callbacks to other films, and the moment when a ragtag band of vigilantes must come together to form a super-team. If you've seen one comic adaptation from the past decade, you'll have a sense of where this whole thing is headed long before the group assumes their first power poses. But even if Birds of Prev doesn't reinvent the wheel. it sure as hell gets it spinning. Those who wish their superhero movies had a little bit more Lisa Frank and a whole bunch more female gaze may find themselves falling in love with Harley Quinn all over again.

The marital dysfunction initially on display in this uneasy comedy about an American family's disastrous ski trip in the screensaver-perfect Austrian Alps is relatively benign in the way of most relationships, a sum of the myriad irritants a couple learns to endure each day as part of the pact to remain together. Familiarity may not always breed contempt, but it sure can work a spousal nerve from time to time. In this lesser remake of the terrific 2014 Swedish film Force Majeure, minor squabbles about texting and meal schedules snowball into marriage-threatening discord after husband Pete (Ferrell) temporarily abandons his wife Billie (Louis-Dreyfus) and their two preteen sons when a controlled avalanche goes awry and nearly buries them beneath the cascading snow as they sit outside in the ski resort's dining area overlooking the mountains. After this character-revealing incident, Billie stews in disbelief and anger in reaction to Pete's shameless act of cowardice (to worsen the offense, he grabs his precious cell phone before running away), while he downplays the potential danger the snow slide posed to the family and (more pointedly) fails to acknowledge that he chose his own safety over the welfare of his wife and kids. From there, the sonic boom preceding

High Fidelity (Hulu)

Did the world need another rendering of **Nick Hornby**'s comic novel about a record store owner on a quest to figure out why his relationship failed? The kind of people that relate to the obsessive music fans depicted in Hornby's book and Stephen Frears' 2000 film starring John Cusack these collectors and mixtape makers, seriously judgey about other people's tastes, kinda jerky - will reflexively say no; they are nothing if not purists. Me, I always preferred the book to the



movie ... which makes me a different kind of jerk, but a jerk nonetheless.

To get back to the original question: The original question is the wrong question. What the world needs is to know how bedazzling a performer Zoë Kravitz is, and this new Hulu miniseries - executive produced by Kravitz and starring her as Brooklyn record store owner Rob - is the perfect showcase for that. Kravitz has always projected cool-girl vibes, and that carries over here, too (only a cool girl could pull off Rob's black leather duster jacket). But she also gets to be vulnerable and nerdy, horny and raging; also, a very sloppy eater of sugary cereal. She gets to be all of the things – a real live girl! – and that is what makes the miniseries' gender switch not a gimmick but a great starting point to explore heartache and halting steps at new love in the time of Tinder and Spotify playlists. The episodes run a tidy length - roundabouts 30 minutes each - but they feel full and textured, borne out in the production design (a cracked iPhone screen, bodega coffee) and the chemistry between the cast, including Rob's employees: Dolemite Is My Name breakout Da'Vine Joy Randolph in the Jack Black role and David H. Holmes as Rob's watchful, tender best friend. Oh, and the music's terrific. Naturally.

Love Island (Hulu)

For more plasticine girls and boys, you'll want Love Island - the UK version, not CBS' chintzy U.S. knockoff that flopped last summer. This winter edition is currently being filmed in a stunning South African beach house turned Orwellian nightmarescape: As ever, there are dozens of surveillance cameras tracking 24/7 the goings-on and gettings-on of some extremely good-looking Britons. This season's been a slow starter, but now that some couples are feeling comfy enough to act a little soppy, and other couples are ready to claw each other's eyes out, Love Island is right back to being the ickily addictive social experiment we've come to love. Crack on. - Editor-in-Chief Kimberley Jones

each subsequent controlled avalanche sounds as a warning the marriage is in rapid decline, tumbling at great speed toward the bottom of a peak that may become forever insurmountable.

Although Billie's micromanagement of her family's life is slightly annoying - and she occasionally channels her emotions in misplaced directions - the movie clearly sides with her, feebly trying to explain Pete's seemingly sudden egocentric behavior as a midlife crisis precipitated by his father's recent death. But the latter carpe diem psychology in Jessie Armstrong and co-directors Faxon and Rash's Americanized screenplay is strained, stranding Ferrell (whose acting chops are limited) in a role that recedes from view next to Louis-Dreyfus' more sympathetic character, which she masters both dramatically and comedically. A scene in a bathroom stall hysterically demonstrates once again why this razor-sharp actress has few peers

when it comes to getting a genuine laugh. The genius of Ruben Östlund's original script

was its lack of tidy justification for the husband/father's spineless behavior. Turns out. he's just an asshole, plain and simple. Whether the movie engages in male-bashing is debatable, but its gender alignment unequivocally tips in favor of the female perspective. No doubt the movie will be online fodder for bruised egos declaiming the inherent bias against white men in today's culture. (Yawn.) To its credit, Downhill strives to remain character-driven rather than devolve into a jokey take on a delicate premise. Given Hollywood's rehashed bastardizations of reputable films from abroad, that plaudit amounts to something more than faint praise. *** - Steve Davis

THE LODGE

D: Severin Fiala, Veronika Franz; with Riley Keough, Jaeden Martell, Lia McHugh, Richard Armitage, Alicia Silverstone, Lola Reid. (R, 108 min.)

The essence of drama will always have a thread of cruelty sewn into it (even the clown slipping on a banana skin hurts his ass). If the characters are not subjected to some kind of existential driver then there is no reason for them to enter into the story. The Lodge embraces that cruel streak as its raison d'etre.

It begins with those small cruelties that mean everything to those involved. A family has been shattered: The father (Armitage) has run off with a younger woman (Keogh), leaving his estranged wife Laura (Silverstone) to look after their children, Aidan (Martell) and Mia (McHugh), But he wants to make Grace part of their lives, and a Christmas holiday in the backwoods, just him and Grace and the kids, is the way to do it. Except Richard can't be there, the kids hate Grace, and they already know her dirty little secret about how exactly she and their father met.

That's the first twist of the knife. That daddy has to stay at home and work, leaving the kids and Grace in a cabin, that's another twist. And the blade keeps twisting and twisting and twisting, deeper and broader, pulling all the flesh away.

The script, by Scottish scriptwriter Sergio Casci and directors Severin Fiala and Veronika Franz, remixes many of the elements of Fiala and Franz's first film, the equally tricky Goodnight Mommy. Claustrophobia, delusion, unwilling mothers, antagonistic children, all recur here, but they add strands of faith and religion, meshing cult beliefs with cabin fever, and the interplay of innocence and naivety, punishment and contrition. They deliberately play with sympathies, not even really clarifying who is the victim and who is the villain – if those words really quite apply - until the story crystalizes around a startling, heartbreaking performance by Keogh, the walking definition of inherited damage. Without her, much of the drama would fall apart, and her more-than-passing resemblance to Silverstone fills in some fascinating backstory with the idea that Richard swapped the mother of his children for a "younger model." Yet how much misery does the audience need to see a likable and damaged character endure?

The icv beauty of the countryside, in contrast with the claustrophobic wood paneling

of the lodge, creates two equally terrifying environments to let this psychodrama play out. It's a unique counterbalance: It's unfortunate. then, that Fiala and Franz are so heavy handed with their symbolism, both religious (how many times can the same picture of a saint fall over?) and in the use of a doll's house to symbolize internal collapse and manipulation. Seriously, horror directors should declare a moratorium on hand-crafted figurines for the next couple of years (or at least until memories of Hereditary wear off).

Yet the biggest issue - beyond a final sneaking suspicion that much of what has gone before is impossible - is that cruelty. It's all emotional, rarely physical, and almost bloodless, but it's so constant as to be grueling. It was there in Goodnight Mommy, and it's not that Fiala and Franz relish it. Instead, it's that they place so much emphasis on it that they lose perspective, and the closing act becomes a grueling slog. After a while the knife is so twisted that all is left is sadness, and the denouement is inevitable. That may be the point, but they make it sooner than they realize.

RIDE YOUR WAVE

When boy meets girl and girl meets boy and they fall in love and it all happens in the first act, you know you need to brace yourself for some heartache

Ride Your Wave, the latest anime by rising master and pop art joy machine Masaaki Yuasa, gives you two characters it's easy to love. Minato (Katavose) is a small-town trainee firefighter who always tries to do the right thing, but he's daydreaming about the tall girl with auburn hair he can see surfing every day from the top of the fire station; Hinako (Kawaei) is the girl who knows how to glide effortlessly on the waves, but is a little more awkward on land. An adorable meet-cute brings them together, and they spend the summer on and off the beach in a first love that has all the makings of a forever love.

And then the color is stripped from the world in a beautifully orchestrated, tearjerking moment, and it feels like this could become a slightly mawkish melodrama. Yet it only takes enough time for the tears to subside before something magical happens, and the universe opens up to a fantastical way to say goodbye.

Coming in the wake of the unbeatable double bill of The Night Is Short, Walk on Girl and Lu Over the Wall (plus his critically loved revisionist take on Devilman), with Ride Your Wave. director Yuasa may have secured his position as the most important anime creator working today. It's not just the distinctive look of his films - a mixture of pop art vivacity, Gaugin's impressionist sensibilities, and current kinetic CG modeling – but the sheer, raw, pure heart of his work. He loves his characters, their foibles, and their inner lives. His observations seem random, but when he focuses on cooking eggs and how freshly ground coffee blooms, it becomes an important character note that will pay off. He adds a layer of joy to the script from Reiko Yoshida, whose insight into the emotional lives of teens and young adults has been given a more somber skin in two recent anime smashes. Liz and the Blue Bird and A Silent Voice. This time, Yuasa keeps the emotional weight, but adds a dreamy lightness that makes it all float.

And that's why Yuasa's films work. Yes, the colors, the fun, the J-pop soundtrack, the breaking waves so immersive that you can almost feel the spray in your face. But it all comes back to the characters growing, seeing their flaws or their troubles, and healing. Yuasa entrances the

A SIMPLE WEDDING D: Sara Zandieh; with Tara Grammy, Christopher O'Shea,

Boy meets girl, girl meets boy, they fall in love, the happy date is set, cakes are ordered, dresses are squeezed into - but wait! Hijinks and disruptions, cold feet and kissing cousins, but none sufficient to derail an inevitable "I do." The wedding day rom-com is an American institution and, like every institution, due for an update. That's what the small but oddly charming A Simple Wedding tries to do, when Iranian American lawyer Nousha (Grammy) and artist Alex (O'Shea) are steamrolled into rapid nuptials by her very traditional family.

While A Simple Wedding touches on culture clashes and questions of American identity, don't think The Farewell. Instead, this is much more a My Big Fat Iranian Wedding, with broad comedy and sassy one-liners (many delivered by Henderson as Lynne, Nousha's sardonic but supportive lesbian best friend). But there's undoubtedly a very contemporary meet-cute when the couple-to-be exchanges coy glances at a "Smash the Patriarchy" rally - her in an apron with a huge cartoon penis on the front, him in white jeans with a giant menstrual blood stain in the crotch. It's still a meet-cute, and one of many conventions that dominate the front half of A Simple Wedding. Lynne is on-hand to prove that stable relationship can work, while still dealing with baggage because her wife, Tessa (Reid), is bisexual. There are the divorced parents, with friction between Alex's mom, Maggie (Wilson), when she's forced to deal with her ex, Bill (Mackenzie), and the fact that he is happily remarried to Steve (Eckhouse). Of course, there's the awkward interfamily dinner where all the awkward family stories come tumbling out in the most pointedly awkward ways.

But the conventions fall apart somewhat in the second half as the script by first-time feature director Sara Zandieh and co-writer Stephanie Wu throws Nousha and Alex's burgeoning relationship for a loop. While still not wholesale subversive in the way of the underestimated Jennifer Aniston/ Paul Rudd vehicle The Object of My Affection, it does pose some mild questions about what rom-coms are for in a style reminiscent of Ruby Sparks. Yet much like Ruby Sparks, it's never going to veer too far away from the inevitable happy ending. Instead, its roundabout route means it gets to ask what "happy ending" means when so many cultural norms have been surpassed and supplanted. Buoyed along mostly by the bright and brisk delivery of Grammy (who delivers the best lines while keeping the sentimental streak going), A Simple Wedding is never quite as complex as the title suggests. Yet its easy charms and efforts to revise, rather than rewrite, the book of rom-com love make it worth the RSVP.

2020 Oscar-Nominated Short Films: Live-Action

Considering the wealth of short films that end up playing the international festival circuit every year, it's always puzzling how often the Academy Award-nominated short subjects category ends up being a mixed bag. Opener "A Sister" is a compact, taut thriller that rapidly accelerates into a crash course in how to build nail-gnawing suspense with little more than some expertly executed cross cutting and a single sterling performance. Canadian-Tunisian co-production "Brotherhood" tackles a familiar familial theme from an altogether new angle but still manages to drag at a relatively short 24 minutes. "Saria" is impressive for its ambitions but also uneven in the telling. Thankfully, Marshall Curry's "The Neighbor's Window" is a stellar little slice of New York City apartment life that starts out as a riff on Hitchcock's Rear Window but quickly morphs into a quirky, funny, and ultimately tremendously moving meditation on marriage, maturity, and counting one's blessings. A movie about a children's entertainer is not necessarily a film for children. A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood may be about Fred Rogers, the creator of Mister Rogers' Neighborhood and epitome of kindness for generations of American children, but it's a mature and poignant character study - albeit one with puppets. Based loosely on Tom Junod's highly lauded 1998 profile of Rogers for Esquire, the script makes Rogers the supporting character, explaining him by what he meant to others: In this case, burned-out journalist Lloyd Vogel (Rhys), still carrying trauma from his broken relationship with his father. By changing that focus, A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood brings that essential essence of Fred Rogers to life, and reminds us by his example how important it is to like people just the way they are. Becoming Leslie D: Tracy Frazier. (NR, 84 min.)

Like most portraits of icons, this documentary about late downtown fixture and celebrity without portfolio Leslie Cochran dips into hagiography, although the film does not seem as worshipful as it is surface-deep. In his alcoholism and talent for reinvention, Leslie was more an avatar of the Make Austin Weird sentiment than its iconic embodiment. Often it appeared as if his fans and gawkers were goading Leslie's drunken behavior rather than appreciating the eccentricities he made palpable. Before Austin cheerily adopted its weirdness slogan, people were moving to this part of Central Texas because a tolerant community allowed them to let their so-called freak flags fly. In recent years, Leslie allowed people to feel a certain proximity to weirdness without crossing into the danger zone themselves. *Becoming Leslie* exposes the true price of nonconformity. The odious working conditions for female on-air talent at Fox News and the first high-profile stirrings of the #MeToo movement is the subject of the double-entendre'd *Bombshell*. Theron nails the distinctive smoky voice Megyn Kelly and manages a note-perfect replication of her appearance as well. However, even though the character's physical attributes are impeccable, Kelly's toxic ideologies (i.e., Santa Claus is a white man) are underplayed. She's one of three women at the heart of Bombshell's story. Gretchen Carlson (Kidman) is really the first anchor to lower the boom on Ailes (played with loathsome sexism and ample padding by Lithgow), while Robbie plays a naive yet ambitious fictional "evangelical millennial" who we observe being sexually humiliated by Ailes. Color Out of Space

Dickensian. Shakespearean. Brechtian. Orwellian. Pinteresque. Kafkaesque. There aren't many authors whose names have made the leap to being a term for a whole school of literature, and Lovecraft makes that cut. His name evokes eldritch dread, a sense of powerlessness against things in the dark and the void. In this case, it's the Gardners in their New England home - Nathan (Cage), Theresa (Richardson), their stoner son Benny (Meyer), witchy daughter Lavinia (Arthur), and youngest boy, Jack (Hilliard). A strange metallic object lands in their yard, and the rules of reality start to collapse in horrifying ways. For fans of Lovecraft, this may well be the most successful attempt to bring his warped writings to the screen. But visual affectations aside (I haven't even mentioned the inordinate but predictable use of kaleidoscopes), Fantastic Fungi is an engaging look at the scope of an organism that is so much more than a pizza topping. But that discovery and the tentative steps toward mutual semi-understanding kindle the undoing of both Joio's corrupted kidhood worldview and his goofy, goonish imaginary Hitler. This is a coming-of-age story unlike any other, filled with the director's trademark heart and a soul-stirring argument against the ever ready darkness of unswerving "patriotic" nationalism. They are the most rounded characters, but when the worm turns and the movie's ensemble of disinherited progeny indignantly clamor after learning the gravy train has derailed, the collective avarice displayed by the secondary cast of characters is almost giddy. If you don't know Little Women, you might get a little lost with writer/ director Greta Gerwig's plotting. Instead of relating in a linear fashion the tale of the four March girls of Concord, Mass. - pretty and practical Meg (Watson), headstrong Jo, saintly Beth (Scanlen), and brattish baby of the family Amy (Pugh) -Gerwig opens the action in New York, where adult Jo has gone to become a writer, and then rewinds to different chapters. It's a thoroughly loyal yet modern adaptation, especially in its physicality: Shoulder shrugs, head cocks, and eye rolls are all part of the arsenal of these Civil War-era teens, and the March girls are forever in a state of pummeling each other. circles as the voice of **Lady Aurelia Hammerlock** in *Borderlands*, Thompson said that the lack of representation of people of color in media and creative spaces creates the perception that they don't exist there. "We absolutely do. You see the lie long enough, you start to internalize it. That is detrimental to a child and will affect them into adulthood. I always appreciate opportunities to dispel the myth." The Geeks of Color Expo is an opportunity "to give love and honor ourselves," Thompson said. "We are creative. We are bold. We are here. And we are worth it."

It is, in many ways, a small story. Two British lance corporals - Schofield (MacKay) and Blake (Chapman) - are sent on an urgent mission to call off a doomed attack. They have only their feet to carry them across this blasted, muddy landscape. Basing the story on family history. Mendes' terrifying view of conflict is poetic and tragic, dreamlike without the forced stoner surrealism that too often afflicts war dramas. It is instead impressionistic, most especially in its highly structured cinematography by Roger Deakins . A story of good men trying to prevent a dangerous attack made by ill-informed leaders, based on bad information and bloody intentions? This is no period piece, but a warning. (01/10/2020)

A simpler, clumsier script would have the Parks as cardboard spoiled villains and the Kims as some kind of Robin Hoods. But Bong takes a more three-dimensional approach, so there's a recklessness, a ruthlessness, a pettiness to their social climbing. Keep a body count of the victims of their grift, and let that guide you as to whether they're really leveling any socioeconomic playing field. (10/25/2019)

The script never knows whether it wants to be reverential or referential, and ends up being a hodgepodge of cameos and flashbacks. Much as he left traditional Star Trek fans livid with his ham-handed revisionism on that hard reboot, here he's even more likely to raise the ire of people who have bled these stories for decades. 

Twain's Texan Metamorphosis

Mat Davidson needed to get some songs out of his system, so in November he released his second full-length with local label **Keeled Scales**. *Adventure* thus offered a turning point for the wondersome folk artist, who'd recently moved to Austin from his home state of Virginia.

"I'm trying to go through some metamorphosis, and I'm just at the beginning of it," he explains months later. "It feels like the end of a really long phase, and hopefully the start of another."

Following two other EPs in 2019, the world-weary upright piano and guitar musings

of *Adventure* spin decidedly scaled-down from atmospheric expansions on prior album *Rare Feeling.* For Davidson, the new disc finally shakes off a long lineage of instrumental density akin to orchestral layering by the **Low Anthem**, who brought him to Providence, R.I., in a series of formative early 2010s projects. "I had been a die-hard fan of theirs in

Boston, so it was like some weird fantasy joining your favorite band," remembers the singer.

Meeting up locally at Eastwoods Neighborhood Park, the multi-instrumentalist arrives fresh from dates playing bass in and opening for **Buck Meek**'s band. Later this month, he heads out with his other main act, **Langhorne Slim**. Despite the patchwork of full-time touring gigs, the newly minted Austinite now holds a lease to a tiny, rustic studio in North Campus.

"I moved around a lot as a kid, and I started to realize I don't love that," says the 34-year-old. "I'm feeling more on solid footing, and that's the challenge. It's a lot harder to make meaningfully positive music, rather than explore the dark side of things." Rooming with just a tape machine.

Davidson plans to continue work at Montrose Recording in his most recent home of Richmond alongside Twain mates bassist Ken Woodward and drummer Pete Pezzimenti. Currently, he spends days at the print shop of Little Mazarn principal Lindsey Verrill and jokes that proximity to UT may lead him to pursue a doctorate. Turning the page on his prior songwriting, Davidson's working on prose to accompany a collection of last decade's lyrics.

"I hope when the book is done, I can see that as one half and start working on the next half – which is hopefully a bit brighter," he explains. "It's weird to realize you do have control over your mood. I never wanted to believe it."

Last Saturday evening, Davidson closed out a showcase of Keeled Scales artists at Eastside social club the **Pershing**, his internal meditations literally lowering the whole standing crowd.

"You all sat down while I had my eyes closed," he remarked onstage.

That foray into the local scene continues Wednesday, Feb. 19, at **Brew & Brew** alongside **Dwight Smith** and **Emily Whetstone** of **Van Mary**.

"My friends have made roots and communities, and it hit me really hard last year that I hadn't even made the first step," concludes Davidson. "Coming to Austin, I felt selfconscious about that, but it's been so welcoming. I hope to be here a long time."

Paul English (1932-2020)


Longtime drummer, intimidator, and righthand man for **Willie Nelson**, drummer **Paul English** died Tuesday, Feb. 11, at age 87.

Among practitioners of the largely Texasspawned "outlaw country" movement, English stood as the realest of them all. Born near the Texas panhandle in Vernon, he boasted a criminal past as an oft-arrested street hustler and pimp in the underbelly of Ft. Worth in the Fifties. A primal percussionist who'd grown up playing trumpet, he admitted in a 1981 interview with *Modern Drummer* that he began playing drums by "accident" in 1954 when Nelson and his brother **Billy English** needed a sub at the radio station where the former deejayed.

A dozen years later, English joined Nelson's band full time and soon took on the roles of muscle, accountant, and bagman for the touring group and best friend to the bandleader. Nelson honored him with the song "Me & Paul" from 1971's Yesterday Wine:

"I guess Nashville was the roughest, But I know I've said the same about them all. We received our education In the cities of the nation, me and Paul."

English remained such a crucial part of the always-touring institution that he maintained his own specially designed tour bus, which generated national news in 2014 when it popped up on Craigslist. Beginning in the Eighties, Paul shared percussion duties with his younger brother Billy. While the former's instrumental skills remained only workmanlike, Paul English's true outlaw nature made him one of the genre's bestknown drummers. — Kevin Curtin



Brew & Brew Solo Sets

On Saturday, Feb. 1, **Christelle Bofale** played to a crowd seated on quilts, perched on love seats, and lined up on wooden benches. Tea lights illuminated the back room at **Wright Bros. Brew & Brew** off East Fifth Street. Before launching into "U Ouchea," the local songwriter complimented her hosts:

"These are my favorite shows – bedroom-y, living room-y vibes. We're all just sitting here feeling however we want to feel."

Sam Gerhard says the homey fixings help "model the behavior" for a consistently silent, attentive audience in the space. He and **Audrey Davis**, a barista at the coffee shop, began putting on the near-weekly concerts last October. "Solo Sets" offers an outlet to local band members striking out on their own as well as small ensembles.

"We want artists to be validated," explains Gerhard, who runs sound. "The idea is to provide an intimate place where people will actually listen."

The intention aligns with the Eastside locale's past lives as **Punctum Records' Studium** record store and the **Lemon Lounge** listening room. Last year, owners walled off the adjoining space to half its former size. Splashy shapes from local muralist **Will Bryant** now line the walls.

Eventually, 23-year-old Davis began her delightfully pocket-sized bookings, typically \$5 a show. **Charlie Martin** of **Hovvdy** offers a rare solo appearance Sunday alongside **Nay Wilkins** and **Claire Puckett** of **Hikes**. The show promoter, who becomes visibly emotional while watching her shows, says the weekend set with Bofale, **Tåsi**, and **Montsho Jarreau Thoth** (aka **Pothos**) stands as a highlight for the 100-cap room.

"People were crying and it felt so supportive," recalls Davis. "Montsho told me, 'Why do you think this one worked? Book family, and family will show up.' We've found that to really pack the space, we need to book artists that also support other artists."

Valentine's Day itself got its name from a Roman priest and physician named Valentinus who was beheaded sometime around February 14 by Emperor Claudius Gothicus (no, I am not making that name up) for basically being openly Christian.

Over the years, Valentine scholars have speculated that St. Valentine's Day is basically a Christian coverup for Lupercalia, which derives its name from the cave den in which Romulus and Remus were raised. The festival of Lupercalia involved the sacrifice of a goat and a dog, the bloody skins of which were then wielded by half-naked young men who ran through the streets whipping people with them. Pregnant women believed that the blood streaks from the whips would bring them healthy babies. By AD496, Pope Gelasius denounced the festival. My guess it was because of the color scheme ... and for the waste of dogs and goats.

Fast-forward a thousand years and Chaucer picked up the Valentine's ball by declaring February 14 "St. Valentinus Day for mating birds." After that, most of Christendom slowly got on the bandwagon until eventually an American graduate of Mount Holyoke College began mass-producing Valentine's cards featuring cupids and hearts. That pretty much sealed the deal. If you can't get God involved, capitalism is always happy to step in.

But I digress. If you want to use Valentine's Day as a convenient excuse to confess your heart's desire, you won't be the first. Rituals exist for a reason. I just think it's much more honest and vulnerable to do it without all the fanfare. For all we know, St. Valentine could have been beheaded on a Monday anyway, right?


Some attribute the first Valentine's card as being sent by Charles, the Duke of Orléans, in 1415 to his wife while he was a prisoner in the Tower of London.
