

The Dog That Caught the Cop Car

De-policing becomes partisanized, but who is really putting themselves at risk?

My two favorite topics of late – mindless cop worship and brainless Republican rule - merged on Tuesday, as the state's top GOP leaders proposed harsh measures to punish Austin for cutting the police budget.

Their scheme makes little sense and would do us no real harm, but it sure sounds like something that'll show us pinkos! (Remember, we're not really the target audience here. This is fan service for their base, a distraction from the 10.000 Texans who've died from COVID-19.)

Remember when criminal justice reform was pitched as a bipartisan issue, championed by both the Austin City Coun-

cil and the Texas Public Policy Foundation? Yeah, that's not a thing anymore. Libertarians, fiscal conservatives, and committed Christians - people over whom the GOP claims political dominion - all have

> legitimate rationales to make common cause with justice advocates. Many have done so, not with the fervor on the left, but not just for show, either. Perhaps a post-MAGA GOP will again concern itself with the high costs and poor outcomes of the justice system.

For now, we're on the path we traveled a decade ago to reform health care, when the tools of technocracy became weapons of radical socialism once in the hands of a (Black) Democratic president. While a unanimous Council's willingness to reduce police spending is momentous, the framework it adopted to do so is not radical. In the proper light, it's rather conservative - right-sizing a tax-funded service to Austin's actual needs and means, and improving efficiency through reorganizations and even outsourcing. You know, like managed-care Medicaid, or charter schools. What is Greg Abbott complaining about?

LEFT LANE FOR PASSING ONLY

This is now a consensus position among the pragmatic progressives who run Austin.

HEADLINES

BACK IT UP NOW, DSHS Austin Public Health reported 350 new cases of COVID-19 in Travis County on Tuesday. an almost 100-case increase from numbers reported the day before. APH said the increase in cases started last week when APH received backlogged laboratory data from the **Texas Department of State Health Services**.

RENT RELIEF OPEN On Wednesday, Austin opened applications for the city's Relief of Emergency Needs for Tenants (RENT) grants, a lottery rent-relief program for Austinites who have lost income because of COVID-19. See p.14 for eligibility requirements.

PANDEMIC PIGSKIN Longhorn Athletics Director Chris Del Conte said UT-Austin is finalizing plans to hold football games at Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium at 25% capacity, according to an email to season ticket holders. With DKR's full capacity being 100,000, that means up to 25,000 fans could potentially be seated in the stadium.

AISD MOBILE APP Austin ISD has launched a free app that will allow students, staff, and families to receive notifications from the district and any schools for which they wish to subscribe. The app also features a COVID-19 self-screening tool for users to complete before coming to and leaving school. It's available on Apple and Android devices.

BEANBAG ROUNDS – which law enforcement agencies call "less lethal" munitions - can cause serious injuries and should not be used for crowd control, wrote a group of **Dell Medical School** surgeons in a letter published in The New England Journal of Medicine last week. Their opinion is based on their experiences treating patients injured by beanbag rounds fired by APD during two days of protests earlier this summer.

NOTHING NEW HERE The Austin Police Department announced this week that video evidence of APD's use of force at protests earlier this summer won't be released until the Travis County District Attorney's Office decides whether the cases will be presented to a grand jury. Last month, APD delayed releasing the videos within the standard 60-day time frame.

AUSTIN'S SOLAR-POWERED FUTURE Construction began this week on the Pflugerville Solar Project, a utility-scale solar project with 144 megawatts of capacitv. With this latest addition. Austin Energy is expected to become 52% renewable in 2021.



(Again, I say: unanimous Council.) There are many Austinites who think a 25-30% reduction in police spending over 12 months doesn't go nearly far enough. Laying off officers currently in uniform is not a deal-breaker for groups such as Grassroots Leadership or Communities of Color United, who say they want APD wholly abolished in five years.

It's easy to dismiss such positioning as solipsistic - look at those woolly-headed lefties who imagine a world without cops! More relevant to the moment is that it's undemocratic. Now, I don't believe the claims of our marvelously mature friends at Voices of Austin that four out of five residents fear for their safety in our streets. (As some of them surely know, there are ethical standards in the polling industry that dictate how survey results should be disclosed, which they still have not met.) But I do believe that Austinites have not vet voted for a future without police.

Electoral politics is not the only form of democracy, but it's specious to pretend elected officials are failing, or selling out, when they listen more to their voters than to nonvoters in the streets. Now that we know who's running for Council this November (see p.10), the incumbents are facing stronger challenges from their right than from their left. Of the 10 districts, the ones that probably best reflect the median Austin voter (not the median Austin resident) are D7 and D10, and Council Members Leslie Pool and Alison Alter have both broken toward the front of the pack on police reform.

OF MAPS AND COMPASSES

We talk about left, right, and center as we try to orient ourselves within an unfamiliar political landscape, but we should not forget that politics is not symmetrical.

The coalitions on the left and right are not mirror images of one another; voters are not ideologically distributed in a nice bell curve, with the majority "in the middle." On criminal justice reform, the Council, the abolitionists, and the Republicans (and VoA Democrats) all claim the popular mandate. Depending on the circumstances, geographies, and levels of government, they could all be correct.

It's no accident that Team Red had to go to Clown Town, er. Cowtown to make an announcement they could have made here, and surround themselves with popular elected officials in no danger of losing their seats rather than the many vulnerable Texas House members in the Metroplex. This august crowd nodded dutifully as Abbott the Big Red Dog made noises about freezing property tax revenue for cities who defund the police. (We'll likely see multiple bills filed for next session that each define "defunding" differently.)

People like Sen. Jane Nelson, chair of Senate Finance, and Ft. Worth Mayor Betsy Price, the former county tax assessor, all know such a plan would never pass the current Legislature, let alone one with a purple or blue House. (Democrats already chair the criminal justice committees in both chambers.) They also know the Texas constitution forbids a statewide property tax. And they know that even if it did pass, progressive blue-city voters could end up with lower taxes than their neighbors.

It's all more woolly-headed than the actual proposals for de-policing from Austin's left, let alone what Council actually did. After years of crying "socialist!" and abandoning the fealty to reason that used to be its brand, the GOP is now losing to actual socialists and has made reason a Democratic value. They, and not the reformers, have become the dogs that caught the cop car.

Also on Wednesday, ULI Austin, the local branch of the Urban Land Institute, hosted a discussion about a new white paper they're about to release concerning Transit Oriented **Developments.** special zoning enclaves clustered around rail stations. The paper, called Transit Oriented Development: Opportunities for Affordability and Mobility in Austin, will be available any day now on the ULI website, austin. uli.org, but a few themes seemed pretty clear.

One of the main recommendations ("made screamingly loud," said one speaker) is that there be no fee-in-lieu option involved in affordable housing requirements for TODs. Current regs require 10% of square footage be devoted to income-restricted affordable housing, but developers can opt to pay into a housing fund instead. To date, that has not created many units of any sort anywhere, and fewer in these high-opportunity neighborhoods.

> Other recommendations included better communication; simplifying the process and lowering barriers to entry for small developers; and finding funding to support incomerestricted units, not just "market affordable" (which is "unaffordable" for half the population).

But by far the biggest-picture theme was to expand the "T" in TODs to mean more than just rail transit. "It was in some ways a strange choice" to adopt TOD zoning only in Red Line station areas, said another speaker, instead of along high-frequency bus lines that already carry more people. "Dedicated right-ofway is enough of a commitment to transit" to make transit-oriented development viable. Expect to hear a lot more about that idea when it's time to talk about the zoning rewrite again, especially if the ambitious Project Connect transit plan passes in November.

And for City Council, it's already time to talk about the zoning rewrite again, as next Thursday's meeting will include an executive session discussion of the Acuña lawsuit that struck down the last effort. There are already 131 items on that Aug. 27 agenda, including some 39 zoning cases.

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Budget Passes With Big Cuts to APD

CMs celebrate first step, acknowledge hard work ahead

Austin City Council voted unanimously Thursday morning, in adopting the fiscal vear 2021 city budget, to immediately cut about \$20 million from the Austin Police Department budget, investing all of it into programs meant to reduce the need for police in the community. The vote also set the stage for \$129 million in additional cuts to the department's funding throughout the fiscal year.

The money divested from APD will be reinvested into social services, including \$6.5 million to house people without homes, \$1 million to treat substance use disorder, and \$1.37 million for workforce development. By addressing the root causes of crime - unemployment, housing and food insecurity, and lack of access to mental health care among them - Council hopes to lay the foundation for a public safety apparatus that does not rely on policing as the solution to societal problems fueled by generations of inequity.

Most of the savings achieved in the immediate cuts are a result of a decision to cancel the next three cadet classes - one in November and two in 2021. Currently, APD has funding for just under 200 vacant officer positions. Each class graduates about 65 cadets, so in effect, canceling the three classes could shrink the police force by about 200 officers by the end of 2021.

If the classes actually remain canceled, that is. Mayor Steve Adler told us that the classes could be rescheduled in 2021 if certain conditions were met, like if reforms to the culture and instructional model at the academy are implemented, or if the number of officers retiring increases to the point that new officers are needed to maintain current staffing levels and to alleviate new pressure on the police pension fund.

Adler said the move to cancel all three classes - which initially did not receive unanimous support; some on Council wanted to cancel just the November class - was needed to immediately begin building up the alternative-to-policing public safety system. "We've got to actually start spending money on alternatives so they can actually start doing that work, then measure results," the mayor told us. "But we're not ruling out classes in FY 21."

The overtime fund allotted to police officers - some of which is used filing reports or



when an officer is in the middle of a call when their scheduled shift ends - will also be cut by \$2.8 million. And another line item that allocates money for APD's office supplies, such as pens and snacks, will be cut by \$3.1 million.

For some advocacy groups, the promise to cut \$150 million - about one-third of the department's budget - is welcome, but not enough. "We are grateful to everyone who for years [has] poured their energy into bringing about a more equitable city," a statement from Grassroots Leadership reads. "But the budget passed today does not meet this moment."

Grassroots and another advocacy group, Communities of Color United, have called on Council to cut \$220 million from APD's budget and invest it into housing programs, Austin Public Health, and the city's **Equity** Office, which has become highly respected among advocates since being established in 2016. "The city must support the existing Equity Office to begin to undo the decades of racism that have plagued its decisions," CCU organizer Maya Pilgrim told us. "To do

Council Redirects APD Funds to Abortion Support

\$250,000 allocation part of larger investment in social services

Redoubling its unprecedented investment made last year, Austin City Council infused its nascent abortion care practical support program with some \$250,000 as part of its historic reallocation of Austin Police Department funds toward health and social service programs.

The funding "will help break down the barriers for Austinites trying to access abortion care," said Lilith Fund Deputy Director Neesha Davé. "In solidarity with our community partners, we demanded the city reallocate funding from APD and reinvest those funds in significant community safety and wellness needs, including abortion access. We celebrate this victory ... and recognize there is still much work to do to systemically transform how this city makes our communities safer."

In 2019, the Chronicle reported on Council's vote to direct \$150,000 to support logistical services for abortion access, the first of its kind in the nation. The money will assist women with transportation, lodging, child care, and emotional and doula support. The move came amid rising hostility toward abortion rights – nationally, statewide, and at the municipal level in Texas, where small towns across the state have passed anti-abortion ordinances. The measure is also push-

back against the Texas Legislature's restrictive abortion laws. State law bans cities from directly funding abortion, and laws like Senate Bill 22, passed last year, further erode local government's ability to contract with abortion providers and affiliates.

Last year, former Council Member Don Zimmerman sued the city to block the funding; in December, a district court ruled against him, and he's now appealing the case at the 8th Circuit. This June, the anti-abortion group Texas Right to Life also sued the city (in a now pending case), arguing, in a wide stretch of a legal defense, that despite U.S. Supreme Court precedent, the funding is illegal because anti-abortion laws have never actually been scrapped from the state Constitution.

Contrary to what anti-choice advocates claim, the city funds would not go to abortion providers or the procedure itself; rather, they'll go through Austin Public Health, which will disburse the money to organizations that do not perform abortion but help women with logistical support. In June, following a competitive bidding process, Council approved a contract with Jane's Due Process, an organization that assists young people in obtaining abortion care, with Mama Sana Vibrant Woman and Fund Texas Choice as subcontractors.

Within its immediate \$23 million cuts to the fiscal year 2021 APD budget, Council redirected funds to social services including housing, substance abuse assistance, and workforce development, following calls to invest in public health and safety apart from APD. Pro-choice advocates and organizations including the Austin Justice Coalition have lobbied for channeling some of those funds to abortion services, as barriers to abortion care disproportionately affect low-income women of color. NARAL Pro-Choice Texas collected around 250 petition signatures in favor of the measure.

On Thursday, Aug. 13, Council - led by the efforts of members Leslie Pool, Delia Garza, Greg Casar, and Paige Ellis - unanimously increased its abortion support program by \$100,000, a victory for pro-choice advocates and a reaffirmation of local commitment to health access continually undermined by state officials.

"We celebrate the continuation and increase in funding for practical support services for people seeking abortion care in Austin. The pandemic has exposed the gaps in our care safety nets, and this funding represents a commitment to mak[ing] sure every Austinite can access the abortion care they need," said NARAL Pro-Choice Texas Deputy Director **Emily Martin.** "These times call for transformational change. and we will continue to stand with our allies in calling for more significant cuts to policing, and investment in programs - Mary Tuma that keep our communities healthy and safe."

otherwise will mean to throw more resources and energy into an institution that is unwilling to infuse change and equity into every department and decision."

Still, Council members are celebrating the moment. "This is without a doubt the most significant change in Austin's public safety priorities in generations," CM Greg Casar said after the vote. At the same time, he was realistic about the immense work ahead of Council, staff, and advocates who've helped create the framework for this change. "We know there is so much more work to do in the coming year ... There's so much more we know our community is asking for if we want to truly reimagine public safety."

The FY 21 budget also identifies roughly

\$80 million in additional police functions that could be "decoupled" from APD control and turned over to civilian leaders. One example that enjoys broad support is the creation of an **independent crime lab** that would test forensic evidence gathered by officers and detectives.

A less popular idea is to move **Internal Affairs** –

which conducts investigations into alleged police misconduct - out of the department into a somewhat-independent entity. Doing so would strike a blow to a flawed system of police accountability that so often allows officers to evade meaningful punishment when accused of misconduct. Both proposals - like others included in the \$80 million "decoupling" fund – cannot be executed as easily as the \$20 million in immediate cuts. There are legal and operational questions that must be answered before the city moves forward with truly removing those functions from APD: Who would operate the newly independent lab? Can civilian investigators take on IA investigations, or will they need help from sworn officers?

The final bucket - \$49 million in a "reimagine safety fund" - is designed to

support changes that are even further down the road. Some of these include disbanding the mounted patrol division, abandoning use of K-9 units, and further reducing police overtime. How these funds are reinvested has not been clearly identified, but the funds are likely to go toward further bolstering the local social safety net.

Those choices will be informed by a community engagement process that will unfold across working groups, task forces, and preexisting city boards and commissions over the coming months. The work will be facilitated by 21CP Solutions, a consultancy firm founded by retired law enforcement officials who advocate for police reform. The city has contracted with 21CP and is

expected to begin working with them this week; staff hope to hold the first three of these stakeholder meetings in August.

How much trust advocates have in the stakeholder process varies. Some told us that because Chief **Brian Manley** – still in his post despite growing calls for his ousting since March – will not be spear-

heading the process (led by Office of Police Oversight Director Farah Muscadin and Deputy City Manager Nuria Rivera-Vandermyde), they are more optimistic about the prospect of success. Others were more skeptical, telling us that Manley remaining chief signals that City Manager Spencer Cronk is not committed to divesting from the police department. Grassroots Leadership's David Johnson told us it would be up to impacted communities to see the reimagining process through. "I don't trust the government to do this on their own," Johnson told us. "But I do trust that the people will hold public officials accountable. I don't think the public demand for accountability and for transformative, community-driven justice is going to end anytime soon, either."

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Race(s) to the West

D6, D10 candidates diverge on police, housing, land use

Although District 6 in the city's far northwest - including the portion of Austin that lies in Williamson County - contains suburban neighborhoods that are increasingly purple, it's still home to a sizable chunk of Austin's conservative voters. That makes incumbent Council Member Jimmy Flannigan's leading role in Council's effort to "reimagine public safety" a potential vulnerability as he faces three opponents in his November reelection contest.

"The job of council member is always about making difficult decisions," Flannigan told us recently. "Inevitably, half of the community wants the thing to happen fast, and the other half doesn't want it to happen. But nobody has spent the time or invested their own existence into fully understanding the complexity of D6 the way I have before making those decisions."

He feels confident his constituents will come to understand why and how Council seeks to reduce the size and scope of the Austin Police Department. As he engages with the community as chair of Council's Public Safety Committee, on upcoming budget decisions, and within the public "reimagining" process designed by city staff, Flannigan hopes to thoroughly audit how APD spends its money.

Flannigan's two main opponents are running to his right on police funding. Mackenzie Kelly is making her second run at D6, after finishing fifth in 2014's six-way scramble. Kelly told us she did not support any cuts to the police budget, but that there is a need for reform, notably to the police academy - a process currently underway through Council-mandated audits.

Kelly advocated against Council's vote last summer to loosen restrictions on unhoused people camping in public, which made her a natural ally to the right. "I don't hate the homeless. I just don't think letting people live out in the open is safe, compassionate, or kind," she told us. Every candidate in the race thinks Austin's shelter system is inadequate, but Kelly is skeptical of the city's strategy to buy motels and convert them into **supportive housing**. Instead, she wants to partner with faith-based groups and establish public-private partnerships to connect people with resources to help stabilize their housing status.

Kelly has been a declared candidate for a while, but Dr. Jennifer Mushtaler, an OB-GYN in private practice, is more of a wild card. Mushtaler tells us she feels her medical exper-

tise could serve the city as it navigates the **COVID-19** pandemic. "The campaign is about a rational and thoughtful approach to public health, public safety, and the future of our economic well-being," Mushtaler said. "We need to take a more collaborative and less contentious approach to solving these problems."

Mushtaler and Flannigan were at odds last year when Council, against staff's recommendation, rezoned a portion of her River Place neighborhood for 30 single-family condos. She and her neighbors cited wildfire risk in Northwest Hills and their inadequate means of escape should the condos increase traffic; under Flannigan's proposal adopted by Council, the developer must build a new access road before accessing the full entitlement.

Dee Harrison, a retired Texas Department of Criminal Justice employee, is also running for the D6 seat. She's taken issue with "bonehead" decisions Council has made - like those on homelessness and police funding – and said, "It was time for me to step up instead of just ranting and raving to friends and neighbors."

To the south of D6. CM Alison Alter whose District 10 stretches from Central Austin to the western edge of town - will face more challengers (six in total) than her colleagues. One who's been running for months is Pooja Sethi, an immigration attorney who has devoted time during the pandemic to organizing and providing outreach to people experiencing homelessness. She has proposed regional community centers in every district to provide mental health services, as well as police officers to investigate property crimes alongside staffers from the Office of Police Oversight

ANDY BROWN WINS DEMOCRATS' NOD FOR COUNTY JUDGE

On Aug. 16, local Democratic precinct chairs selected lawyer, former Travis County Democratic Party chair, and Beto O'Rourke staffer Andy Brown to be the party's nominee to serve the unexpired term of former County Judge Sarah **Eckhardt** (who defeated Brown in the 2014 primary for that office). Brown got 56% of the chairs' votes on the first ballot against another former TCDP chair, **Dyana Limon-Mercado**, and County Commissioner Jeff Travillion.

The rarely used process to fill a vacancy on the ballot prompted by Eckhardt's resignation to take over Sen. Kirk Watson's seat after his own resignation - caused discomfort within a party committed to diversity and small-d democracy. Out of 247 precincts, only 143 have elected chairs; only 136 of those were eligible to vote, all of whom did so. Of those, 120 are white (like Brown, and unlike his opponents).

"It was surprising that it was only a one-ballot election," said Katie Naranjo, the new TCDP chair who was herself selected just two weeks ago, through the same process, to succeed Limon-Mercado. Naranjo stressed that other Texas counties are going through the same process, as required by state law, to fill ballot vacancies that occurred after the March primary.

Misgivings abound, however, from those who felt that the process, though legal, was undemocratic, contrary to the party's values, and a reflection of systemic racism. Ana DeFrates, a Limon-Mercado supporter, said, "We can't ignore the demographics of the precinct chairs; we can't ignore the racialized identities of the candidates." Prominent Democratic donor Aimee Cunningham, who worked on Limon-Mercado's campaign, posited that the precinct chairs willfully ignored "what has been happening in Travis County, [which] is choosing to elevate young, experienced people of color." a reference to Delia Garza's and José Garza's victories for county and district attorney. Activist and Austin Community College Trustee Julie Ann Nitsch was likewise disappointed with the chairs: "They said they polled their precincts, [but] that's not okay, because you're still only polling people that are active in the party. This wasn't your vote; this was the county's vote."

Nearly half of the county precincts had no vote at all, since their chairs (also elected in party primaries) are vacant. Limon-Mercado said those vacancies stem from "the natural rhythm of volunteer work" and its high turnover, and the fact

that some precincts are more Republican. "It's not just low-income precincts ... It's a reflection of multiple things."

Limon-Mercado says that as party chair, she heard from young precinct chairs of color that "they didn't particularly feel welcome." She attributed this both to history and to lifestyle differences that more easily allow others to devote hours of volunteer effort. While the TCDP is committed to having diverse voices in its leadership, she said, "If we invite them in and we still have this culture that is not welcoming. they're not gonna want to stay." At the same time, she stressed that "the precinct chairs ... really care deeply about this community" and that she has confidence in Naranio's dedication to equity.

The Democratic electorate was small but not as tiny as the Republicans'. GOP Chair Matt Mackowiak chose their candidate himself: Michael Lovins, an attorney, who in a press release said he is running to "prioritize public safety" by "expand[ing] county law enforcement patrols within the City of Austin." Conversely, Brown said his top priority is criminal justice reform. "I want to do everything I can to increase diversion programs and ... increase funding for mental and behavioral health options. I think Commissioner Travillion and I have a lot of common goals ... I'm looking forward to working closely with him on the Commissioners Court." - Lina Fisher (Sethi served on the task force that led to the modern OPO). "The plan is really about how to break down systemic inequities by providing EMS, educational, and preventive resources into community centers," Sethi told us. "When we talk about these services and support systems, we need to invest in systems that are regionally based so they are available to more communities."

Sethi has become the de facto choice for activists pushing to revise the **Land Development Code**; she has said **Transition Zones** – the most contentious aspect of that

effort in many D10 neighborhoods – are needed, especially around transit stops. She's less committed to rezoning D10 more broadly, saying only that "Austin needs more housing in all parts of the city."

Alter says she doesn't disagree, but remains committed to an LDC vision that

she sees as adhering more closely to the **Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan**'s goal of "compact and connected" communities – with higher density on transit corridors but not neighborhood upzonings. "I want to see a more strategic and thoughtful approach" to LDC Revision once it resumes, Alter told us. "I feel like if we had done it

that way instead of 'my way or the highway,' we would have been able to adopt changes we had unanimous agreement on."

On public safety, Alter has championed reinvestments of police dollars, particularly in **EMS**, which will receive funding for new medics, ambulances, and a new chief medical officer position in the new budget. "The community is asking for change to public safety in Austin," Alter told us. "Some feel they're not receiving the level of safety they expect and some feel their very existence is overcriminalized. We have tried the route of growing the

system by adding police officers and it didn't work. Now, with the help of public safety experts and community leaders, we are trying a new approach."

Another notable D10 candidate is **Robert Thomas**, a GOP-friendly lawyer and former leader of the state Workforce

and Facilities commissions, who placed third in the eight-way D10 race in 2014. Thomas is aggressively attacking Council's votes to reallocate police funding: "Police brutality and disregard by a few can be addressed without demonizing every man and woman that takes the oath to protect and serve," his campaign website says.

ICE Quietly Renews 10-Year Contract With T. Don Hutto Detention Center

Despite rising criticism of the conditions in its Texas detention centers, **U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement** quietly renewed a 10-year contract with **CoreCivic**, the private prison company that operates **T. Don Hutto Residential Center** in nearby Taylor. Immigration advocates say the 10-year agreement is "unusually lengthy," a sign that the current administration is hoping to "lock in" detention in Texas, benefiting private prison corporations for years to come.

The immigrant prison houses largely asylum-seeking women and has been the subject of numerous accusations of abuse, including sexual misconduct and medical neglect, as previously reported by the *Chronicle*. Following mounting pressure to cut ties with the center, the Williamson County Commissioners Court voted in 2018 to end its ICE contract to operate Hutto.

However, the local opposition didn't stop ICE from contracting directly with CoreCivic, sparking concerns from more than 40 state and local groups, and U.S. House Representatives including Congressman **Lloyd Doggett**, that ICE flouted federal law and engaged in "deceitful practices" in its procurement process. In an ongoing suit, immigrant rights group Grassroots Leadership filed a legal challenge to obtain documents from ICE about the bidding process. An ICE spokesperson

tells us the agency "remains compliant with federal contract and acquisition regulations in the announcement and subsequent award of these contracts."

According to federal data, the contract amounts to about \$260 million. CoreCivic has said ICE also plans to make millions of dollars in repairs to the facilities.

In June, **COVID-19** hit the Taylor detention center after employees tested positive for the virus. All have recovered and are back at work, as we previously reported. **Bethany Carson** with **Grassroots Leadership** says individuals detained at Hutto have reported multiple COVID-19 cases; however, ICE fails to include the facility in its "COVID-19 ICE Detainee Statistics by Facility" tracking.

Nationally, more than 1,000 detainees have tested positive for COVID-19, according to ICE. While medical experts say release for the detainees – especially those already afflicted with health problems – is the best way to prevent an outbreak, Carson tells the *Chronicle* that ICE has denied parole requests from several of these women at Hutto.

"Making backdoor deals to line the pockets of private prison corporations at the expense of people confined behind bars while COVID-19 is spreading like wild-fire shows the complete disregard for human life in ICE custody and how perverse financial incentives are the bedrock of incarceration," says Carson. — Mary Tuma





Wrongful Death?

Family of man killed by APD sues the city

Attorneys representing the mother and sisters of Aquantis "Ajay" Griffin, who was shot and killed by Austin police two years ago, have filed a wrongful death suit against the city and the eight officers involved, alleging excessive force.

In the early hours of Aug. 17, 2018, APD responded to a shots-fired call near Sixth Street and San Jacinto. A fight had broken out inside of Terminal 6 bar, where Griffin, who had traveled to Austin from his home in Baton Rouge. was attending a concert performed by a childhood friend.

The fight moved outside, and Griffin formed his hands into the shape of a gun, pretending to fire at the crowd. causing some of them to disperse, according to Louisiana attorney Garrett Condon, who is representing Griffin's mother, Shalitha Ross. In response, another participant in the dispute, Jordan Seguin (who was later arrested), fired shots above the crowd, including toward Griffin. The attorneys representing Griffin's mother say the

21-vear-old was unarmed when he fled the scene but came into possession of a firearm before returning to the scene and encountering officers who were positioned in an alleyway outside of the bar.

As Griffin was running toward the officers, they opened fire on him, ultimately hitting him with 30 bullets. A ninth officer also shot Griffin with a stun gun. Griffin was taken to Dell Seton Medical Center, where he later died from his wounds. Bystander video obtained by the Chronicle corroborates this part of the story: the video, posted by a Facebook user, appears to show Griffin falling to the ground after the first gunshots. Then, as he is lying motionless on the ground, a barrage of rounds rings out.

At the time, the shooting was portrayed by APD as justifiable - Griffin was holding a gun and didn't drop it on command. During a media briefing following the shooting, Assistant Chief Troy Gay told reporters, "I was able to view several of the videos" from surveillance and body-worn cameras, "and you can see, in one of the videos, the individual's weapon points toward the directions of the officers."

But after reviewing some of the bodyworn camera footage in May 2019. Condon called this account into question. In a letter to Dexter Gilford, director of the Travis County District Attorney's Civil Rights Division, Condon wrote that Griffin didn't point his gun at any of the officers in a threatening manner. As Griffin was running, he turned toward them, causing his arm holding the gun to swing toward the officers in a "natural movement." Instead of firing, Condon wrote, Griffin turned to flee from the officers, after which they opened fire.

Condon wrote that after Griffin had been struck once or twice, he threw down the weapon, which the footage shows skidding toward the officers. At that point, "rather than arresting him and giving him a chance at his life," Condon's letter continues, "the officers then fired somewhere in the order of 25 to 30 additional shots at [Griffin] with his back to them, lying face down on the ground, and disarmed."

No footage from the incident has been released to the public, and the

CITY, COUNTY EXTEND COVID-19 ORDERS FOR THE LONG HAUL

As expected, Austin and Travis County extended their **COVID-19** orders last Friday, on the eve of their August 15 expiration. The new orders run through December 15.

Travis County Judge Sam Biscoe extended the county's order requiring face masks and banning gatherings of more than 10 people. There are some exceptions to the latter, such as church services and recreational sports programs. that are allowed under Gov. Greg Abbott's statewide COVID-19 orders. Face coverings are required while inside public buildings, as well as outside when social distancing is not possible.

Biscoe's order also extends a local disaster declaration and public health emergency for Travis County; as the order notes, Austin Interim Health Authority Dr. Mark Escott expects the number of infections to rise if health and safety protocols are lifted. Friday's order includes the same penalties authorized by Biscoe in July: fines of up to \$1,000 for gatherings and up to \$250 for not wearing masks.

A few hours after Travis County's announcement, the city extended its similar order, called "Stay Home, Mask, and Otherwise Be Safe." The new order continues to require Austinites wear face coverings, practice social distancing, and limit gatherings with people living outside their household, while modifying nursing home standards in compliance with new state guidance that permits some visitation.

With Austin ISD set to begin classes on Sept. 8, the city directive also stipulates that pre-K and K-12 schools must phase in on-campus learning based on community risk -

unless such actions will result in loss of Texas Education Agency funding. The risk tiers range from stage 1 (little or no COVID-19 community spread, 100% on-campus instruction) to stage 5 (100% virtual learning amid "widespread uncontrolled transmission threatening our healthcare infrastructure").

These guidelines are among many released by Austin Public Health last Friday in its new emergency rules and guidance on school reopenings. The 50-page document also includes a call to screen bus operators and students before boarding, but Escott emphasized the phased reopening in his COVID-19 update to Travis County commissioners earlier this week: "Regardless of where we are in staging on September 8, we are recommending that schools only open at 25% for the first two weeks," he said, "so that the schools, the teachers, the students can get used to a new system; they can work out any kinks in the processes and can make changes and adaptations before introducing dditional students."

Local health authorities have stressed that taking action before school starts will minimize the risk of community spread. As Escott explained Tuesday, this means more extensive testing - including for those without symptoms - for the next three weeks. "We are trying to increase our testing so that we can capture more of those positive cases, even the asymptomatic ones, and push that positivity rate lower and lower before September 8." Austin-Travis County's most recent positivity rate was 8.8%; Escott said the goal is to get it below 5%. - Beth Sullivan

Applications for RENT Relief Lottery Now Open

Calling all renters who have lost income because of COVID-19: The city wants to pay your rent. No, really. Starting Wednesday, Aug. 19, at 8am, applications opened for a lottery rent relief program, with \$12.9 million available in direct aid to struggling renters.

Anyone within Austin's "full purpose city limits" who's lost income due to COVID-19 and earns under 80% of Austin's medium family income (MFI) is eligible to apply for a Relief of Emergency Needs for Tenants (RENT) grant. That means \$54,700 is the eligibility cutoff for one person, while a four-person household must make less than \$78,100 annually to qualify. No social security or identification number is required to apply, although any household member who has a number is asked to provide it.


Qualified applicants, who cannot be taking advantage of any "federal rental assistance programs," will be picked at random for the program, which pays up to three months' worth of rent to the tenant's landlord, depending on the applicants' income. Applicants making 30% or less of Austin's MFI (\$20,550 for one person, or \$29,300 for four) are eligible for three months of rental aid; those making between 30% and 80% are eligible for one month of aid.

The RENT program comes less than a month after Mayor Steve **Adler** prohibited landlords from posting notices of vacancy except in select circumstances, in an order which runs through the end of September. This aid program will continue until January 2021, or until funding runs out. It's also offering grants to community organizations to raise awareness about this program, support tenants, and work to prevent evictions.

For more information and to apply for a RENT grant, visit www. austintexas.gov/rent. - Clara Ence Morse D.A.'s Office continues its review of the case. The eight officers were placed on paid administrative leave at the time, as is standard procedure, but it is unclear when they returned to regular duty. At least one returned to active duty: Joseph Cast went on to be one of three officers involved in the fatal shooting of **Mauris DeSilva**, who was undergoing a mental health crisis, in July 2019. (Another of those three, Christopher **Taylor**, went on to fire the shots that killed Mike Ramos this past April.)

Austin attorneys Rebecca Webber and **Scott Hendler** are now working with Condon on the case. APD officials did not respond to questions from the Chronicle, but a city spokesperson said, "We are aware of the lawsuit and will respond appropriately."

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"Solidarity, Not Charity"

Mutual aid manifests in Austin to share resources during COVID-19 and beyond by LINA FISHER

"I was living in a camp under 183 and Burnet, and a couple people came by with some food one day. That was right when the pandemic started, about in March."

Britt, a 57-year-old volunteer with Austin Mutual Aid, had been houseless on and off for 17 years when her encampment, along with about 15 others around Austin, began receiving meals and water from ATX Camp Support at the start of the pandemic. "I didn't have anything else to do and conditions are pretty bad under there, you know. So I just started helping them pass out food there in that area, and got to know them and become friends with them. They were making a great impact in people's lives they were helping people. We saw an immediate need for masks and hand sanitizer, [and] we made masks by hand. I made over probably 300 masks by myself out of T-shirts. That's how I got involved."

The effort she got involved with, ATX Camp Support, is a collective bringing together several different groups that provide aid at encampments across Austin, including Primrose Community Care, Austin Food Not Bombs, Stop the Sweeps, and Austin Mutual Aid. The last name explicitly describes what they all practice, and new mutual aid groups continue to arise to meet community needs among not only those without shelter but all Austinites. A recent example is the ATX Free Fridge, which provides refrigerators in food-insecure neighborhoods where residents can take what they need and leave what they can to help others.

As of about two months ago, Britt is housed in a co-op and receives a weekly stipend with the help of Austin Mutual Aid. But she did not abandon her community in the Burnet encampment. For months, she prepared meals every day to be distributed by volunteer drivers on Burnet and at other encampments across town, until she had to quarantine because of COVID-19 exposure in July. (In the interim, three of her housemates got COVID-19 and recovered.) Now, she and other co-op members help a camp near them with outdoor showers and other hygiene supplies.

Britt says when the pandemic hit in March, mutual aid efforts were the first on the scene, before the city had organized any relief. "In the beginning the city did not provide any masks, hand sanitizer, there was no one down there checking on us. And that's what we took over." She defines mutual aid as "people helping people." Though she has worked with ATX Camp Support and likely will in the future, she says it's less important to be affiliated with one particular group than to address a need wherever it pops up, in whatever way she can.

Rebecca Steingut, who volunteers virtually with Austin Mutual Aid, says, "The simplest definition of mutual aid ... is each giving what you can and ensuring that others in the community are provided for, who in turn will give, right? It is very Othering to be constantly the recipient of charity [and to] not feel that you have something to give." A phrase that often comes up among mutual aid workers is "solidarity, not charity."

For Steingut, that means organizing pickups and drop-offs of supplies through a Facebook group and connecting those with needs to volunteers through the platform Covaid from her computer when she's not occupied with her 17-month-old baby. "We have people contact us with all kinds of needs, like their uncle needs a mask, or diapers, or they need someone to help them get their stimulus check," she says. "We've been pairing those needs with volunteers on our list. Sometimes it's picking up something and delivering it somewhere, other times it's just connecting [people with] information."

Primrose Community Care, which operates a mutual aid center out of Monkey-Wrench Books and takes in donations from 4-8pm, comprises a more physical side of the effort. "I had gathered donations from my own little neighborhood group for them - water, toiletries," Steingut recounts. "I said, 'I really can't get to you guys from 4pm to 8pm because of the baby's dinner and bedtime, could you send someone to pick it up?' And they said, 'Absolutely, we will make that happen; in the meantime, do you need anything for your baby?' Complete, exact definition of mutual aid."

CARING FOR COMMUNITIES

Bobby Cooper, who founded Austin Mutual Aid in March, stresses that it's about building relationships to invest in communities, rejecting the top-down model of traditional charitable organizations. Cooper moved to Austin from New York, where in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy he founded Occupy Sandy, a disaster relief effort that raised millions and garnered 60,000 volunteers, and filled in where the Red Cross and FEMA weren't. "[They] really dropped the ball in New York. A lot of that was that they didn't understand, the[ir] model is very topdown." Cooper's model, conversely, is derived from the original use of the term "mutual aid" by the anarchist philosopher Peter Kropotkin in 1902. "The anarchist model is, you go to neighborhoods, you talk to them and ask them what's on their mind," Cooper says.

But during the pandemic, mutual aid has had to adapt to social distancing. "COVID really tied our hands. In a natural disaster. going door to door is the first thing we do, vou know. Mutual aid to me is all about talking to people and getting to know what families, individuals, communities want, what they're missing, and what they have to share, whether it's time or skills or resources. I live in East Austin and most of my neighbors are over 70 on my block. ... They're the kind of people I wanna look after, make sure they are doing OK. Unfortunately in the beginning, instead of running out the door, we had to build up more of an effort online."

Austin Mutual Aid's biggest project right now is the "Beat the Heat" GoFundMe campaign to buy water and shade supplies that help the unhoused deal with the grueling Texas summer. So far, they've raised \$18,568 of their \$20,000 goal. Cooper says at first he was reluctant to solicit funds, having mostly dealt with in-kind donations in the past, but he soon realized how much longer they could provide support if they raised money. "It's literally a drop in the bucket ... I think people are in a really giving mood right now and they want to help, but can't leave their home. So what they have to offer is funds."

While Austin Mutual Aid has shifted its model to work with the current climate, it still deals primarily with in-kind donations. Another group in Austin, the UT-studentled Mutual Aid Collective ATX (MACATX), carries out its relief efforts entirely online.

"I think we're very different – Austin Mutual Aid and the Camp Support folks are really great with hands-on volunteers, all the folks at MonkeyWrench Books are great with donations and keeping up a physical mutual aid center. We're more financial," says Sarah Philips, a recent UT-Austin grad who formed her collective in March. MACATX operates as a fundraising and education platform, creating social justice infographics and raising thousands in donations.

Philips says Austin Mutual Aid and MACATX fulfill complementary roles in the Austin landscape. "It feels like it's working well, because we have our roles and fill different holes in the community. It just made a lot of sense to do financial [work] because we [UT students] exist in this weird dynamic where some of us are not from Austin, and a lot of people ... are now moving out of Austin because of COVID. I can do all this online and remotely, and still be helping people around me."

SHARING THE WEALTH

"All this" is one gargantuan job: fielding several requests a day from people who have filled out a Google Form or contacted the collective directly on social media. Both Philips and Cooper have trouble connecting with people offline, especially with the physical restrictions of the COVID-19 world. "It's not always possible because of the volume of requests, but I like having some sort of back-and-forth ... Especially for folks who don't have transportation and can't use the buses right now. Also, not everyone has Venmo, Cash App, all these online money transfer systems ... Like, of course we can send money, but are you able to access what you need with that money?"

MACATX began as a COVID-19 relief effort for students but quickly grew to help communities far beyond UT. In the intervening months, it's been so successful that it's been able to share funds with mutual aid groups in Dallas and Houston as well. Philips attributes it to a sleek social media presence (@mutualaidatx) run by students, some of whom have just finished a degree in advertising or graphic design, and fundraising capability with the use of the platform Phly, founded by a rising UT junior, Lucious McDaniel IV.

Phly allows MACATX more speed and flexibility with donation distribution than platforms like Venmo and Cash App, which, due to their strict limits on how much groups can take in and send, "have large sums of money held in limbo," McDaniel explains. "We allow them to take in an

unlimited amount of money ... free of charge." Philips says these strengths, due to students' skills in marketing and business, have made MACATX successful, and "we kind of need to share the wealth."

The flow of wealth can fluctuate in a completely donation-based model, and MACATX made an Instagram post acknowledging that fact on August 11: "We are temporarily pausing our emergency fund redistribution due to some administrative tasks/financial restructuring." But rather than the flow running dry, it's quite the opposite. MACATX clarified with the Chronicle that they'd "been using personal bank accounts to handle transactions and redistribute money to folks who need it. This wasn't an issue back when we were getting \$20-100 donations from a few folks, but since our base has expanded to thousands, we've been moving thousands of dollars in [and] out which has to be reported as earned income [and] taxed. Because we'd rather not let those donations be wasted on tax, we're looking into ways to become a nonprofit." In the interim, in-kind donations of supplies can pick up the slack.

Both Austin Mutual Aid and MACATX have contributed support to Black Lives Matter protests, with food and water and with cash to pay medical bills. MACATX's stated principles include abolition of police, Black liberation, and Indigenous sovereignty, among other commitments, and Cooper says that the concept of mutual aid is deeply intertwined with racial justice movements, "Forming connections and building community is something that I know, for East Austin, we need. We need to support the culture and the people that have lived here who are facing gentrification. Even when the police brutality protests started a few weeks ago, that made me think, our mutual aid effort is something that could replace the need for calling the police. Because if we have neighborhoods where people know each other ... that's another way to solve our problems within our community. I think mutual aid can help with that, can replace the need to buy something or call an authority."

Britt, who has lived experience with both offering and receiving assistance through mutual aid, intends to continue to help those who helped her. "Last night, I came home and cried because there's some people still out there, some of my friends, and it's very hard sometimes to go home and be sheltered and know that they're not. And so I cry, and I get it out, and I just get up and do it again the next day. I'm very passionate about what I do because I just recently got housed and it's wonderful. All my needs are met, I'm funded for a whole year ... and through that I'm able to help more people. It's the real definition of mutual aid; We're people helping people."

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

Forty Acres of Anxiety: **UT Students Return to Campus**

Go this way and that way: signage to control traffic flow on campus

UT students Sarai Velasquez and Maria Henriquez are taking COVID-19 seriously. The two friends, both wearing masks, are sitting six feet apart when I come across them hanging out on the South Mall's lawn.

With the fall semester less than two weeks away, I thought it was time to get a finger on the Forty Acres' pulse: How are UT students feeling about coming back to campus?

"To be honest, I'm pretty scared about coming back to campus," Maria tells me. A double major in mathematics and chemistry, Maria has one in-person class this fall, an organic chemistry lab, plus TA'ing a virtual chemistry class. When coupled with the commute from her Riverside apartment, it's a tight schedule that means longer hours on campus, and potentially more chances for exposure.

Sarai shares her friend's worry. A third-year kinesiology major, Sarai's taking a weight-lifting course in person, but because of her schedule - with online lectures right before and immediately following the weight-lifting class – she doesn't have a choice but to spend more time on campus than she's comfortable with. "Instead of being on campus, which is one hour or two hours twice a week, I have to be on campus for four hours twice a week now," she explains. For now, Sarai's plan is to find somewhere outdoors to work on her virtual coursework "because I don't trust going into the buildings."

According to UT, about 50% of students have opted for a fully virtual semester. Still, the overwhelming majority of students live off campus, which for some students raises concerns about the spread of COVID-19. University officials have said both on and off campus parties will be banned. However, Sarai's skeptical of just how feasible enforcing that will be. "I just feel like the temptation is always gonna be there to have parties especially in West Campus," says Sharai, pointing to a Fourth of July pool party she says went viral on UT Twitter. "A lot of people weren't wearing masks, obviously they weren't social distancing, and it didn't get shut down." She says of the bad behavior, "How are you not taking other people's lives into consideration? Because it's killed people."

Sarai and Maria, of course, are but two of the tens of thousands of Longhorns who'll be navigating a college experience unlike any before - none two that will be the same. Risks will be weighed, and the costs of which won't be borne equally. "The people coming back to Austin for school, they're wanting to live out their whole college experience," says Sarai. "I feel like that's really gonna come into play, like who takes [COVID-19] seriously and who doesn't? Yeah, your friends are gonna be in town, but how badly do you want to risk seeing them? Because you never know if you're asymptomatic or not."

Alamo Drafthouse Joins Growing Number of Movie Theatres Reopening in Austin

Since mid-March, the majority of Austin's cinema screens have been dark, but now they'll be getting a lot brighter with the announcement that the Alamo Drafthouse Slaughter Lane will be one of a number of theatres reopening this weekend.

Across the summer, cinemagoers and movie lovers who wanted to get out of the house had to choose between either outdoor screenings at Blue Starlite Mini Urban Drive-In and Doc's Drive In theatres, or the handful of smaller cinemas that had opened their doors under strict hygiene protocols, such as IPIC and EVO Belterra.

This weekend will see the chains start to get more serious about reopening, with AMC Barton Creek, Cinemark Southpark Meadows, and Regal Gateway and Regal Westgate all resuming programming. Now add the Alamo Slaughter Lane to the list as the locally based chain begins a rolling reopening program. In an echo of AMC's decision to attract customers back with 15-cent ticketing on opening day, the Alamo is offering free tickets for Bill & Ted Face the Music, the third film in the popular Bill & Ted franchise starring Keanu Reeves and Alex Winter, for preview night screenings on Wed., Aug. 26.

Slaughter Lane is the first Austin location to reopen. with others around the country to be confirmed. Expect other local sites to follow suit. However, the Drafthouse confirmed that it will continue to offer its Alamo on Demand service, as that was not a response to the pandemic but a new expansion of their portfolio.

The reopening comes at a tough time for the Drafthouse, after alternative newspaper The Pitch published an article about systemic issues in their Kansas City location, one that has caused concern among some of their most loval customers. It also comes after another recent round of furloughs of senior and long-term staff.

However, the chain seems to be trying to pick up where it left off in March. Obviously, there will be the big upcoming releases; the long-delayed The New Mutants, Christopher Nolan's Tenet, and an exclusive engagement of Bill & Ted Face the Music. Alamo Drafthouse CEO Shelli Taylor, who assumed that role from Drafthouse co-founder Tim League in late April, said these films "are made for the big screen experience. We've all dearly missed going to the movies, and with our many enhanced safety protocols we feel that we can come together again confidently and securely."

The Drafthouse also announced specialty programming plans, with two new strands: a Making Up for Lost Time series, featuring screenings of *Inception*, *Back to* the Future I and II, Bill & Ted's Excellent Adventure. Donnie Darko, and Edge of Tomorrow; and the quasiironic Masks! series, where the facial coverings of the protagonists (from Batman to Hannibal Lecter) are as memorable as the action.

Speaking of masks, the Drafthouse is also reminding patrons to stick by their new hygiene and social distancing rules, which are spelled out - and even animated for more visual learners - at www.drafthouse.com/ - Richard Whittaker covid-safety.





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#VANLIFE ISN'T JUST A TREND ANYMORE. IT'S A TETHER TO HOME. A cross-country trip to unite a family in the pandemic by Kevin curtin



"Bon voyage," read a text message from my editor. "You are Odysseus."

To that point, the journey hadn't struck me as particularly Homeric. Then again, I was a wreck. I'd lost seven pounds, my eyes were crimson from lack of sleep, worry racked my mind, and I hadn't even pulled out of the driveway. The next morning we'd shove off on a 1,400 mile excursion from Texas to Michigan ... with a 16-pound baby and a 120-pound elderly dog ... in a van that rolled off the assembly line during Bill Clinton's first term as president ... amid the hottest days of summer ... only stopping at gas pumps.

I'm a new parent. Our son was born during the pandemic, and for the first four months of his life, he hadn't met any of his grandparents. More importantly, they hadn't met him - that's what was killing me. I thought about it every day - how our moms waited 35 years to have a grandchild, only to have it come during a pandemic that prevents older folks from being able to fly across the country safely. So my partner and I resolved to bring the little one to the elders, while maintaining a full-on quarantine bubble.

We viewed the venture as spiritually significant - this uniting of generations - but approached safety concerns with pragmatism.

Our first instinct was to get an old camper trailer that contained a bed and a toilet and pull it behind my girlfriend's reliable, compact SUV. As we began shopping for trailers in June, we noticed that owners of used trailers were especially proud of them right now - with prices astronomically higher than they'd been last year. Meanwhile, dealerships in Central Texas seemingly couldn't keep pull-behinds on their lot. A trailer would get posted online, and by the time you'd call the dealer, it'd be sold.

We then considered renting an RV and found an overloaded industry.

"I've been running around with my hair on fire since late May," Billy Mullins tells me. He's the manager at the aptly named American Dream Vacations, an Austinbased business that rents, sells, and services RVs.

Mullins reports a 400% increase in business from mid-May - when Texas state parks reopened - through July, compared to last year.

"There's a lot of first-timers," he says. "We're seeing people who'd normally go to the Bahamas, or take a European vacation, RVing instead. We've sold almost everything that we have to sell. With rentals, I'm booked out now until the middle of August. I have 55 or 60 on the road right now, but if I had 20 more RVs to rent, I could easily put them out there."

Mullins says he inquires with prospective renters about any potential exposure

they've had to COVID-19, and his maintenance crew has had to step up cleaning. They use an aerosol bomb and have taken on other extra duties with disinfecting. It needs to be done fast, too. When a rental is returned, they clean it and do a systems check, then it's on the road again on the same day.

RETURN TRIP

For my girlfriend and myself, this wouldn't be the first time we've traversed this nation's highways in a vehicle equipped with a toilet and bed. In 2007, the last time America fell into a recession, our home state of Michigan represented the nation's highest unemployment rate, and I'd just endured an eight-minute pistol whipping that rearranged my facial features while working a low-wage job as a hotel night clerk. We moved into a 1984 Toyota Sunland Express camper and spent a couple years driving around the country, sustaining ourselves with day labor jobs and lab-ratting ourselves out in paid clinical trials and behavioral experiments at universities. While we were parked in the North Park neighborhood of San Diego, local news shot a segment outside our

camper about Americans in economic crisis retreating to motorhomes.

You could say we've been "#vanlife" since before the advent of hashtags. Now we'd be at it again.

With an RV or rental out the window, we decided to modify my daily driver - a super long 1995 Dodge Ram 3500 previously owned by the Houston Police Department - into a sleepable, poopable vessel. With the help of a fellow musician, who'll remain nameless so he doesn't get requests to help with other annoying van projects, we built a bed with cargo-netted storage beneath, a table that would hold our baby's bassinet, a ducted air conditioning system that would pump cold air directly on our precious living cargo, privacy curtains, and a bank of new and used marine batteries that would power a 2,000-watt power inverter, on which we could run fans, the noise machine that our little one needed to sleep, and - this one was crucial - an espresso maker to power long driving shifts.


During the 10 days of labor we put into getting the big, white whale road-ready, several spectators threw out the term "van life." which I began hearing in 2017 and has been an increasingly popular (and sometimes

lucrative) millennial movement of embracing nomadism and obsessively documenting the lifestyle on social media. It's been the subject of two New York Times features over the summer, though they detailed pleasure cruisers with multi-hundred-thousanddollar budgets - not scared parents feeling like they're in a disaster movie.

Grady Linder - founder of the rental service Voyager Campervans, which was founded in Minneapolis before expanding to Austin - says that the onset of coronavirus concerns in March and April brought business to dire standstill before interest in the customized sleeper vans went "though the roof" in May. Local demand for his tricked-out vans has presented inventory issues.

"It's good for us to have multiple locations because in Minnesota it's too cold to camp in the winter, and in Austin the summer's hot, but it's a great time to camp from fall into the spring, so we can switch vans back and forth," he explains. "We shrink our Austin supply during the summer and operate at a utilization rate of about 50 percent with a smaller-than-normal fleet. But we didn't have nearly enough inventory

this year, and it threw us for a loop. Austin has stayed as busy as any other market through the summer. We're at 100 percent utilization rate, which is well over double what's usual, and we don't have inventory there to meet demand."

Linder also notes that while the average trip period for rentals in previous years had been five to six days, now it's double that meaning people are traveling farther and for longer stretches of time.

"Right now it's the safest way to travel or go on vacation," he says.

WORKING THROUGH THE LOGISTICS

It's true – it's safer for travelers to control their own transportation and the conditions. But travelers should be thinking about the safety of others, too. I still believe some instances of travel are unconscionable. Some people who live in small towns in beautiful, rural places don't want travelers

Where to Park Your Van or RV During Your Pandemic Road Trip

AND OTHER SOCIALLY DISTANCED CAMPING TIPS

Here's the most important rule of camping: Never underestimate raccoons. They will make a fool out of you. It's a hard lesson I've relearned in the last month. Now that you know that, here are some socially distanced camping options. - Kevin Curtin

Free Camping on Public Land. More than a quarter of American soil is public land and a lot of it you can camp on at no charge for a specified period of time, usually 14 days. These grounds, overseen by federal authorities like the Bureau of Land Management or the U.S. Forestry Service, plus state-sanctioned Wildlife Management Areas, are findable on a variety of map-oriented websites. My favorite is FreeCampsites.net.

City Parks. Many small towns have a little tourist park where there's a handful of spacious spots to put up tents or pull in a camper for \$5-10. Often, each spot will have a water spigot and an electrical box. They're usually surrounded by a public park or playground and there's commonly something quaint like an old tractor or a train as the centerpiece. Right now, a lot of them are using a drop box honor system for payment. These are frequently first-come, first-served.

Campgrounds. State and national parks need to be booked in advance right now because of Americans' spiking enthusiasm for outdoor life. On our recent three-week trip, we found that privately owned campgrounds or RV parks usually have spots open day-of. RV-oriented sites can be a bit of a bummer because they feel like a trailer park. Ones with hiking trails, water holes, or other nearby outdoor activities are preferred. Many have adapted to COVID by allowing you to book online or over the phone and have contactless entry.

Parking Lots. The lowest form of boondocking – and often the most convenient - is staying in a Walmart parking lot. The retail giant has long allowed RV rats and van-lifers to sleep overnight in their parking lots – as long as you remain courteous and don't spread out a big mess. Most travel centers and truck stops, like Love's, Flying J, TA, and Pilot, allow overnight parking, which is great in a pinch, but truckers sometimes treat you like an interloper and the sound of 50 trucks idling all night can be loud and make it hard to sleep. Surprisingly rest areas are a poor choice for anything other than grabbing a couple hours shut-eye. From my experience, if you're obviously car-camping, you are likely to be woken up by highway patrol telling you there's a time limit or that it's unsafe to sleep there.



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So You Want to Buy an RV

PURCHASING TIPS FROM TWO "DAY TRIPS" PROS

For years my wife and I resisted the siren call of purchasing an RV. Our resistance was broken down by the contagiousness of the coronavirus and the utility of a camper van that a friend recently purchased.

Oh sure, we had considered purchasing a camper in the past, but the numbers just didn't add up. We could stay at a lot of hotels for the cost of a moderate-sized RV. There were a long list of cons to the pros of owning an RV until the great equalization by the pandemic.

Patty started eyeing RVs in May as the lockdown drove her more and more stir crazy. Her search began heating up when she saw the very cool and expensive Boho Camper Vans on Shark Tank but guickly moved to the more practical Winnebago Travato her girlfriend had purchased.

Patty: Don't put the cart before the horse. We started shopping for RVs years before we talked about how we would use one. While it seemed more likely we'd want to stay in campgrounds with facilities, we could envision places we'd like to visit like Chaco Canyon that would make the ability to primitive camp a real plus. Ultimately, we went with a small Class B motorhome that would provide the greatest flexibility with hookups, solar panels, and generator.

In early June Patty decided she wanted to go kick the tires.

Basically what we were looking for was a toilet, shower, and bed on wheels with heating and air conditioning. Everything else - stove, refrigerator, TV - was optional.

Patty: Purchase your RV from a great dealer. Read the reviews of dealerships online. Try to make your purchase from a local, family-owned dealership with a reputation for customer service.

Stahmann Sales Company in Seguin was the closest dealership with a Travato on the lot. Karl Stahmann, grandson of the founder of the company, interrupted his lunch burrito to show us what he had in stock, which wasn't much. Karl said that RV manufacturers were hit with a double whammy by the coronavirus pandemic. First the factories were idled by lockdowns. Then a lot of people wanted to travel but wanted to avoid public restrooms, hotels. and airports. Hence the run on RVs.

By July, the company was taking orders for next year. Normally, they would have on the lot at least one of each floor plan and color, Karl said.

Patty: Pick the right floorplan. To me. the most important factor that would make a Class B RV worth the investment (around \$90K) was to have access to our own bathroom and maybe a coffeemaker. Since gently used RVs are scarce, we looked for what we wanted rather than taking what was available.



Before we got to the dealer, Patty made me swear I wouldn't sign any papers. We were just going to look. I wasn't going to be the problem. Before we got back to Austin she called the dealer and put down a deposit on the next available camper van.

The Winnebago Travato tricks out a Dodge Ram 3500 Promaster van to become a cozy cabin on radial tires. (The diesel models use a Mercedes platform.) Picture an Amazon delivery van with the comforts of home.

First released in 2015, the Travato seemed small enough for city driving and big enough to carry our travel necessities. It measures 21 feet long and just under 10 feet tall. It can be hooked up in an RV park or be entirely self-contained in the wilderness.

Besides the prerequisite shower and toilet, it

comes with a bed just smaller than queen size. The refrigerator has a freezer, and there's a two-burner propane stove and a microwave oven. Solar panels on the roof charge the batteries and power the basics. The air-conditioning and heat run on a thermostat using the battery or a gas generator.

It's a three-month wait before our camper van arrives. We've been working on names for the silver beauty – Winnie and Tootsie are early favorites. In the meantime we're scoping out state parks and RV parks to decide where to go first.



With an RV or rental out the window - not enough inventory - we decided to modify my daily driver into a sleepable, poopable vessel.

from a hotspot like Texas passing through and potentially bringing COVID germs. (It goes without saying that wherever you go, you should be following the usual safety protocols of mask coverings, social distancing, and so on.)

For our own safety and for the safety of anyone we'd encounter along the way, we vowed not to go indoors while we were traveling, which is why our trip necessitated having a toilet in the van. Obviously, we weren't the only one with that idea, as all of Amazon's travel toilets are on backorder. That dilemma forced me to do the unthinkable, purchasing a - gulp - used portable potty on Craigslist. Typically I'm happy to save money by buying used products, but something people put their butts on is where I'd normally draw the line. In a divine moment of good fortune, the used travel toilet I picked up from a driveway in North Austin turned out to still be in the packaging. Hallelujah.

THE JOURNEY AND THE DESTINATION

It was a hardcore journey, our three-day trek, with lots of laughter and some crying

- mostly from the baby. These were long days of driving, interspersed with frequent stops to feed the little one, so we never covered as much ground as it had seemed. We did treat ourselves to an unnecessary stop in Casey, Ill., to look at the world's largest rocking chair.

It was, indeed, a really big chair.

The first night we found some federal land in Eastern Arkansas on which to boondock - that's what people call camping on wheels without a power hookup. It was serene and abandoned, except for a million hungry mosquitos. The second night, heavy semi-truck traffic prevented us from reaching another stretch of free land to occupy, so we stayed at a campsite in Terre Haute, Ind., where our quarantine trip was nearly nullified by an indignant anti-masker who tried to walk up to us and tell us about how he doesn't need to wear a face covering. We barely escaped.

I hardly remember the last day of driving – all we could think about was getting to our destination. When the van rolled into the driveway on the southside of Lansing. Mich., barely a minute passed before the kid was in his grandma's arms. Even though he's existed in a social bubble, physically,



I'm a little disappointed we didn't go with the floor plan with the bathroom in the very back of the van. I was intrigued by the thought of throwing open the rear double doors and enjoying the morning air while sitting on the throne.

having never been held by a single person other than his parents since birth, the boy didn't cry – in fact he was overjoyed. Maybe he recognized his maternal ancestor from frequent video calls over the last four months, or maybe you just feel what's right in life.

That moment was maybe the only time that things have really felt like they've just plainly, truly made perfect sense in the last four months.

And the American road trip has roared back to life. People are discovering incredible outdoor spots mere hours from home or venturing farther afield, across the country in campers and cars with tents in the trunk – seeing nature, appreciating the in-between spots in the flyover states that are sometimes easy to overlook.

Some of the practices folks have adopted during the pandemic will endure after a vaccine is found, and perhaps the popularity of road-oriented vacations will be among those. For us, traveling across the country in inexpensive four-wheeled self-sufficient quarantine containment served as a reminder that, whatever the challenge is, if it really matters, we can always make it work.



Taji Senior wants you to show her the part of the Constitution that specifically protects Black mothers.

Oh, she knows it's not there. She wants to be sure that you know it's not there, that you're aware this foundational document on which the United States stands, this hallowed bedrock of our democracy, wasn't written with protections for Black Americans or women, and anyone who falls into both those categories is doubly unprotected. That's the

point of Senior's new solo show, premiering this week in a livestream online but also, in a rarity for these pandemic days, in two live performances.

In amendment: the birth of an american myth, or the slow sipping of a peacock tea, a woman named Ma'Dear, who is both enslaved and pregnant, is on trial and faced with what the show's press release calls "an impossible choice": to leave behind her enslavement, in which she is only property, and become a full person; or to remain enslaved and be a mother whose child will be bound to what

she calls "the lie." In the course of the trial, Ma'Dear is able to reach through history for witnesses she can call to the stand: pioneering singer, actor, and activist Paul Robeson; the Sixties activist Fred Hampton, whose work with the Black Panther Party led to his assassination by Chicago police; Kalief Browder, who was accused of robbery at age 16 and imprisoned at Rikers Island for three years without a trial, an experience so traumatizing that he committed suicide; and Kalief's mother Venida. Their testimony brings the audience, as jury and judge, to understand the value

of lives not explicitly covered in the Constitution, lives too precious to be treated as an afterthought, an amendment.

Senior began to investigate this material three years ago, when playwright Adrienne Dawes prodded her to create a solo show for herself. The 20-minute triptych of monologues she wrote about how the Constitution "defines and denies Black people," titled *Amendment*, was workshopped in Salvage Vanguard Theater's Works Progress Austin

new play series, but Senior ultimately felt that it wasn't the show she had wanted to write. She might have left it at that, but in reading Dorothy Roberts' 1997 Killing the Black Body: Race, Reproduction, and the Meaning of Liberty, the book's idea that Black women were excluded from traditional feminist agendas and reproductive rights excluded from civil rights agendas inspired her to re-engage with the material with a focus on Black motherhood.

The version of *amendment* that emerged drew the attention of SVT Artistic Director Kate Taylor, who was interested in pro-

ducing it, but not in the same way most other theatres were producing work in socially distanced times. The Zoomscape had no appeal for her, and it didn't feel right for SVT. Senior pitched the idea of livestreaming a performance from inside a theatre, but Taylor was also interested in exploring "what experiential COVID art can be." That led to the idea of a drive-in production, with Senior performing before an audience in cars. "Taji was game," Taylor says. "I believe we are all so hungry to gather and, despite learning myriad new ways that can be accomplished, getting to do it in a physical space feels so special and important."



So, after *amendment* has its first show livestreamed from Ground Floor Theatre, it will move to Rogge Ranch House, where a stage will be set up in the parking lot and spaces for cars will be marked off and set far enough apart that people can sit outside their vehicles and watch Senior perform live, with the sound amplified and transmitted via radio. Given the limited capacity and need for safety, both reservations and masks are required.

The set-up is more complicated than the standard pre-COVID performance experience, but Taylor believes any extra effort on the audience's part will be worth it – and not just because the show brings back live theatre. "amendment is both challenging and beautiful," she says. "Hopefully, it will provide a balm to many at this moment while also igniting some deep reflection."

They Talk Funny

Austin Sketch Fest 2020 leads with spoofs of a Trump-Biden debate and a speech on toxic femininity by robert faires

Eager to see Joe Biden and Donald Trump go mano a mano on the debate stage? You don't have to wait another month or two. The two candidates will be duking it out this Saturday in a debate moderated by Vanessa Gonzalez.

If that sounds unlikely, then perhaps it's worth adding that the presidential mouth-off is part of this year's Austin Sketch Fest. Yes, the annual jubilee of jocularity, now in its 11th year, is mounting its own version of the much anticipated event with Anthony Atamanuik and James Adomian subbing in for Trump and Biden, respectively – and forgive us for thinking it may be better than the real thing. As the pair proved with their series of Trump vs. Bernie debates for the 2016 election, the two comedians' skill at caricature is second to none, and both can be scathingly funny when working over the political landscape. Indeed, Atamanuik has practically made a cottage industry out of his impressive impression of Trump, following the debates with appearances on various cable series and his own Comedy Central program, The President Show. As for Adomian, he's been honing his Biden impression on his podcast, The Underculture, and it's already sharpened to a brilliantly surreal edge. (His riff on Biden's "CornPop at the swimming pool" speech spins into a Twilight Zone of hilarity.) Having these lampoon versions of Trump and Biden field questions from Gonzalez - a "Best of Austin" Readers Poll choice for Best Stand-up Comic in 2017 - is the icing on this mock debate cake.

Of course, if you're past the point of being able to find anything funny in this presidential election – and, as a past presidential debater once said, "I feel your pain" - you may prefer

the fest's other headliner. Jamie Loftus, performing her solo show Boss Whom Is Girl. In it. you're graced with a motivational speech from premium girlboss Shell Gasoline-Sandwich, who preaches the gospel of toxic femininity in corporate life and explains to the audience's aspiring girlbosses (and their XY chromosome allies) the Pussy Pyramid of Girlboss Needs. Just keep your eye on Shell's Al assistant Patricia, whose evolving sentience and growing antagonism suggest she's computer kin to HAL 9000. Loftus is a joy to watch here, not just because she gleefully skewers that curious cross-breeding of conscienceless capitalism and #feminism - *koff* Elizabeth Holmes *koff* - but because she's so weird doing it - from so far off-center, you can't be sure where the next joke's coming from.

Loftus anchors Friday, Aug. 21, as Trump-Biden does Saturday, Aug. 22, but comedy acts surround both: Los Angeles' Dynamo, Latinx Comedy Pachanga, Red & Yellow, Royale, and Self Esteem Party; NYC's After School Snack, Archnemesis, the Executives, Secret Crush, and TV Party; and the ATX's Bat City, Chlane, An Evening and Possible Morning With Carl Sagan, Pendulum, Prayer Circle, and Victrola.

It goes without saving that Austin Sketch Fest is virtual. That means it's free - you just have to







Storm's Drive-In and Ray's Drive Inn offer food service to your car using the tried-and-true method of carhops. Carhops are unsung heroes on the front lines of food delivery during the pandemic.

Storm's Drive-In has locations in Lampasas. Burnet, and **Hamilton**. Orders are taken at a speaker or you can call ahead. Either way, a friendly carhop wearing a face covering brings your

The menu at all three locations ranges from breakfast tacos to late-night dinner. They feature a classic lineup of burgers and ice cream. The Cordon Bleu Burger is an outstanding favorite. **Elvis** Presley often visited the Lampasas location when he was stationed at nearby Fort Hood.

Ray's Drive Inn on the west side of San Antonio claims to be the original home of the puffy taco and evidence supports the Lopez family history of this most iconic San Antonio food. A puffy taco is just what it sounds like - an inflated tortilla stuffed with delectable fillings.

During the pandemic, Ray's has discontinued dine-in service, which is a shame because the dining room is a museum worth seeing. But they are still open for carhop service, curbside service, and phone orders. Pull up under the canopy and flash your lights for an attendant.

The menu covers a wide variety of Tex-Mex food, burgers, and seafood. Like all good drive-in food, Ray's food can be pretty messy to eat in the car. That's why it is great that Elmendorf Lake Park is a




short distance north on 19th Street. Grab a picnic table in what is one of San Antonio's oldest and most scenic public spaces.

Jazz Mills Provides Free Lunch for the Houseless

Fresh fruit goes a long way on 100-degree days

When Jazz Mills answers the phone, it's prep day. That means "chopping a ton of onions and sautéing all the vegetables and making all the beans. Me and my friend Carrie split the duties in half. So she's making these vegetarian taquitos, we're both working on fruit salad, I'm working on vegetables ..." The fruits of their labor will be 120 dinners for people living at Camp RATT (Responsible

Transition Town), Gov. Abbott's state-sanctioned encampment for the unhoused on 183.

Mills makes meals under the moniker Free Lunch, a largely solo venture only 3 months old. She had been working as an event producer when the pandemic hit and experienced the now-fa-

miliar story: a glut of free time in which she made a drastic career change, parlaying her 15 years of music scene connections into a homegrown effort that now provides 500 dinners a month to the roughly 200 people that live at Camp RATT. Free Lunch's main focus is healthy food, with fruit salad figuring heavily in most meals. Mills says in 100-degree heat, the dry, prepackaged food that often gets dropped off to the houseless community "is really bogus."

"If someone is actually dying in the heat and you give them a peanut butter cracker, the gesture is sweet but we're not helping. Those prepackaged meals create a lot of trash and a lot of them actually don't get eaten," Mills explains. "So when I started going out there I started asking people, 'What is it that you really really want?' And everybody across the board said, 'Fruit and vegetables. We just want things that can help us beat the heat."

Free Lunch makes perishable meals, light and fresh for summer, keeping in mind that many in the camps are diabetic, have dental problems, or are simply vegetarian; bell peppers, cucumbers, strawberries abound. Rather than plastic packaging, Mills uses

compostable boxes: "It is more expensive, but it makes me feel better when I drop off a bunch of meals, knowing that none of it is trash. So it's worth the extra cost for me." She has plans for an edible garden specific to Free Lunch, so the entire process can move toward zero waste.

Free Lunch partners with the Other Ones Foundation at Camp RATT and is current-

> ly committed to weekly dinners on Saturdays to "create some consistency for myself and for them." Mills says that often, organizations like hers overlap and there is surplus food in some camps while other camps get overlooked. "So I committed Free Lunch just to this camp so I could get

my bearings and figure out what does this actually cost per month and what does this feel like laborwise, all of that stuff. Once we become a well-oiled machine, [we'll] essentially create a meal plan where Free Lunch would be providing two meals a day to everyone at that camp. Once that's organized, then hopefully I can implement that same type of meal structure in smaller camps around town."

Mills' vision for Free Lunch is to be a resource, above all: "I'm not competing for grant funding, I'm not competing for city funding ... If we can take some of the meal pressure off of a smaller church ministry or a smaller nonprofit, then they can take their resources and their volunteers and focus it on other things that the homeless need besides the food."

Free Lunch is funded by donations from the community and a program where donors become "Lunch Monitors." Lunch Monitors buy a \$10 monthly subscription to a quarterly zine by Mills and Free Lunch volunteers, which serves the dual purpose of transparency and accountability: "Every three months you'll get an update on what we did [during] our past season and what our plans are for this coming season. Rather than sending out a monthly email list, we wanted someone to have something tangible and beautiful. That's what keeps me motivated, is knowing people are giving us their money and we're making them a promise that we'll do this, so I mean it."

She says her goal is to get to 2,000 Lunch Monitors, which will enable her to hire staff to help cook, drive, and coordinate outreach to different organizations, which she hopes will up the output by the new year to 5,000-10,000 meals a month.

Right now, Mills mostly cooks alone, sometimes with friends who bring leftover fruits and veg from the Sustainable Food Center - but she tries to avoid in-kind donations. ("Someone would bring me a case of 12 yogurts. It's really sweet, but I don't know how to fairly give 12 yogurts to 200 people.") Even so, if she receives unsolicited produce, she'll make something spur-of-the-moment to drop off at a random camp. Structural organization is scarce in times of crisis, but to Mills it mostly doesn't matter. "Really, we want our answer to be ves. I don't want things to be bureaucratic." Free Lunch provides meals not just to the unhoused but to single moms, people who have been put out by the pandemic anyone who's asking for help. "If someone emails me and says, 'I need food,' I wanna



More Community Efforts Addressing Food Insecurity

While organizations like Central Texas Food Bank, Mobile Loaves & Fishes, and Austin Food Not Bombs have been around and doing this work for decades, homegrown initiatives like Free Lunch have been popping up at a prodigious rate since the start of the pandemic, fueled by Austinites eager to rally for their community. Despacho. Formed last week, this collective has already delivered 120 meals to unhoused communities and helped stock ATX Free Fridges with cold gazpacho. www.instagram.com/ despachoatx.

be able to say, 'Sure, I'm on my way.' That if someone calls us and says, 'Hey I'm hungry,' I don't need to see your paperwork proving that you're poor and hungry. You can just have the food, you know?"

Ultimately, it's that empathy that drives Free Lunch. "Our big focus is obviously on healthy food, but also boosting morale. It's gnarly out there." Even with her plans for expansion and formalization, Mills says her personal focus is on cooking at the camp, eventually getting the right permits to build an on-site kitchen, which will allow her to interact more with the community. She recounts that a personal friend passed away recently, the result of living outside day after day in 100-plus degrees. "I want people to realize these types of problems in our community are not necessarily something that we can just vote on and they'll go away. These are complicated, nuanced issues and people really are dying in our streets. If we say we care, if we say we wanna see things change, that requires a lot of hard work. And if you're able to put in some of the work then you should, in whichever way you feel comfortable doing that."




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
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












FOOD NEWS BUFFET

Weird, Weird West

Cowbovs versus witches in Austinite Aaron B. Koontz's The Pale Door

Supernatural Western. That phrase was all it took for Austin writer/director Aaron B. Koontz to head on the dusty trail to making his period horror The Pale Door. He said, "I said those words in front of a Lansdale, and he says, 'You should make the movie,' and then we go dinner, and the next thing I know we're all working on it."

The Lansdale in question was Joe, the endlessly prolific Texas author and master of mojo letters. He and Koontz were on a panel together at the 2018 Boomtown Film & Music Festival in Beaumont when Koontz mentioned the "gunslingers versus witches" pitch that had been rattling around in his head. No stranger to the Weird West (having written Dead in the West, about zombies on the High Plains, and the adventures of devil-plagued gunslinger Jonah Hex for DC Comics), Lansdale signed on as an executive producer; his son, Keith, who was also on the panel, became a third voice on the script with Koontz and longtime creative partner Cameron Burns, with whom Koontz had already produced PTSD shocker Camera Obscura and anthology horror-comedy Scare Package. Koontz said, "It was an honor to be on the panel, and literally one year to the day I was pulling up in my car to Guthrie. Oklahoma. to film The Pale Door."

What appealed to Koontz about the Old West setting was "the antihero sensibilities of these cowboys ... they'll just kill you at the drop of their signature hat. And then you get to throw witches in there, and find a way to parallel their two backstories, and I'm off and running.'

The supernatural part was easy, but Koontz didn't want this to be cardboard cowboys. Instead, he wanted the story planted in the grimy, dusty reality of the time and that included his band of outlaws. The brothers at the center of the bedeviled ruffians, led by hardened outlaw Duncan (Zachary Knighton, Happy Endings) and his greenhorn brother, Jake (Devin Druid, 13 Reasons Why), were based in part on the siblings at the core of the infamous Dalton Gang. Meanwhile fastidious Wylie (Pat Healy, The Innkeepers) was based on middle brother Bill Dalton, who planned and scouted the heists but stayed on the sidelines during their executions. Koontz recalled telling Healy, "You

talk differently than everyone else, because Aug. 21. For review and you come [from] a different level of prestige. You came from a wealthy family.' We had back-

stories for every single one of them and why they became outlaws, and you don't have time to make all of that work, but you layer things in."

He credited his co-writers with adding period and personality details: "The Lansdales helped a lot with that, creating who these people are." So Wylie can't stand loudmouth dimwit Truman (Noah Segan, Knives Out), while there's an unspoken tension between steely gunsel Dodd (Bill Sage, a Lansdale veteran from SundanceTV's Hap and Leonard) and raucous Brenda (Tina Parker, Francesca on Better Call Saul and Breaking Bad). Koontz said, "I told them, both of you have done it. You've totally hooked up. But neither one of you will admit it. You create these points of tension."

Koontz even managed to slip in a little Easter egg all for himself - or rather, a cuckoo's egg. He admitted to being "obsessed" with One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, and most especially with Will Sampson's performance as Chief Bromden. He'd wanted to ensure that the gang was diverse, as a reflection of the historical reality of the time. (Brenda, for example, was inspired "in wardrobe and demeanor" by Laura Bullion, who wore men's clothes when she rode with Butch Cassidy, the Sundance Kid. and Bill Dalton in the Wild Bunch). Koontz deliberately wrote the part of Chief to allow him to cast a less experienced actor in a major role, and that's how he ended up auditioning Oklahoma native James Whitecloud. "I fell in love with what he was doing with his eyes," Koontz said, and Whitecloud made it to the shortlist of three potential Chiefs. "At the end of the interview, he went, 'Oh, yeah, Will Sampson's my great uncle.' I went, 'What?' and he said that 'Yeah, he's my great uncle, and I'm in acting because of him.' So that was [Sampson's] first major role, and this is [Whitecloud's] first major role, and it's magical for me that I could make that happen."

The cast was set, now they needed a Western town, and they headed to Guthrie, Okla, It's not because the city (pop. 11,783) is a film hub – although the drive-in movie sequence from Twister was shot there, and Dustin Hoffman's character was diagnosed with autism in the Guthrie Clinic in Rain Man. It was because of a destination wedding venue. Koontz and Burns looked all across Texas, New Mexico, and Utah, but they settled on bucolic Rollins Creek Old West Town in sleepy Guthrie: not a ghost town, but that period feel of an authentic Western town where the paint was still fresh, with acres of woodland away from the nighttime glow of modern light pollution. Plus, Koontz said, "There was something in my dark sensibilities that I liked about doing these horrible things in this town where people proclaimed their love."

There are a lot of ghost towns and Western-themed attractions, but what Rollins had that others don't was depth. Koontz said, "These other Western towns I went to, they only had exteriors, but this had full interior spaces." That included a two-story saloon that served as both the brothel location and sleeping accommodation for the crew. "I lived on that set for two months," said Koontz. "I had the master bedroom, Cameron lived in my closet, and [cinematographer Andrew Scott Baird] was across the corridor."

The location gave them everything they wanted. Well, almost everything they needed. First, they had to build

their own church for the climactic showdown, where satanic forces are as deadly as a Peacemaker ("The things that happen in that church, the local churches in Oklahoma weren't

cool with," said Koontz). Before that, they needed a second bar for the opening scenes, and this time they found the real historical deal: the Blue Goose Saloon in Snake River Junction. The building had been bought and restored by Orvel Robinson, a local history buff who constructed a complete town around it and now stages cowboy reenactments with his friends at the weekend. "They're the extras in the saloon," said Koontz. "They have all their own authentic Western gear from the 1800s." Yet the original structure is riddled with history – literally. He said, "The [real] Dalton Gang ate and drank in that saloon. One of them was shot in that same saloon in the 1800s, and the bullet holes are still in the walls."

Disaster in the Dust

The true story of the failed rescue that ended Carter's presidency in Desert One BY MARJORIE BAUMGARTEN

History is written by the victors: We accept that as a truism. Accomplishments and successes can feed an epic storyline and stoke a nation's pride, while setbacks on the road to glory are generally shunted into footnotes and sustained only as fading memories.

Desert One recounts the American military debacle known as Operation Eagle Claw, which was launched on April 24, 1980.

by President Jimmy Carter in an attempt to rescue 52 American hostages held captive by Iranian revolutionaries since November

1979. The mission was a colossal failure that was forced to abort before even reaching the embassy. Sadly, the doomed campaign caused the horrific deaths of eight rescuers, the destruction and abandonment of military equipment and aircraft, a national tarnishing of the idea of the invincibility of American might, and most certainly contributed to Carter's loss of the 1980 presidential election to Ronald Reagan. (The hostages, curiously, were released by the Iranians just minutes after Reagan's swearing into office in January 1981.)

By the time the rescue mission was launched, nearly six months had passed since the hostage-taking, and President Carter was subject to heavy national criticism for his reluctance to use military force to regain U.S. citizens. But he was finally persuaded to deploy a Delta Force unit for a rescue mission. At this point in time, Delta Force was a newly formed

specialized-mission unit of the **♦** DESERT ONE army, and Eagle Claw was its first operation. Desert One, despite revisiting the mission's multiple failures, is not interested in plac-

ing blame. Instead, the documentary is a living tribute to those who tried.

Academy Award-winning filmmaker Barbara Kopple (Harlan County U.S.A., American Dream, Shut Up & Sing) has a tendency to select documentary subjects that reveal something about our American character and politics. Desert One gathers a great number of living hostages and Delta Force team members to tell the story of the mission. She even gets Carter to sit for a rare interview about the matter, and also includes the testimonies of some Iranian hostage-takers

and a man who witnessed the debacle in the desert as a child on an Iranian bus that stumbled into the mission by accident. This allows for a multiplicity of perspectives, which makes up for the film sometimes seeming like a series of talking heads. The lack of footage from the mission is compensated for with some striking two-dimensional animation by Zartosht Soltani.

It's an evenhanded presentation, although I wish Kopple had probed more deeply into some other aspects of the story, such as the dawn of

the "special forces era" and the Reagan campaign's imputed involvement in keeping the hostages captive until the minute Carter was out of office. The film, which was produced by the History Channel, may not have had such questions as part of its mission-specific purview. However, what Desert One does accomplish in shining a light on this epic national failure is to celebrate the American can-do spirit and a noble willingness to go down trying.

CUT THROAT CITY

D: RZA; with Shameik Moore, Kat Graham, Eiza González, T.I., Ethan Hawke, Wesley Snipes, Terrence Howard. (R, 123 min.)

The history of Hurricane Katrina is a long way from being written, but with a little bit of distance comes the opportunity for stories. There are many factors - from climate change to institutional discrimination - that make New Orleans an untapped space for stories of corruption. In Cut Throat City, legendary musician and director RZA offers his own take on the politics of the Big Easy's recovery.

In the months following Hurricane Katrina, the residents of New Orleans' Lower Ninth have been mostly abandoned by their government. Struggling to make ends meet, artist Blink (Moore) and his childhood friends make the tough decision to go to work for "Cousin" Bass (T.I.), the neighborhood heavy who sees an opportunity to steal as much as he can before gentrification takes over. When the job goes sideways, Blink and his friends go on the

run, trying their best to avoid Cousin, a newly appointed detective (González) hot on their heels, and the city councilman (Hawke) who may or may not pull all the strings.

On the surface, Cut Throat City presents RZA with the perfect vehicle to meld his musical and filmmaking careers. Exploring economic discrimination through the lens of Seventies gangster movies is the right hook for someone who has, in one way or another, contributed to some of the best genre cinema of the past two decades. And setting the film in a post-Katrina Lower Ninth instantly gives RZA's film teeth. Cut Throat City suggests a version of New Orleans that, by design, prevents the city's Black residents from climbing out of its Katrina-shaped hole. As COVID-19 widens the gap between the rich and the poor in communities across the country, Cut Throat City's institutional assault feels sadly timely.

The film also gets tremendous mileage from its cast. It's no accident that the film chooses to name-drop Tarantino in its opening act. As much as the film serves as a showcase for up-and-coming actors like Moore and González, it is the secondary roles - veteran character actors paired with showstopping monologues that really give Cut Throat City its sense of style. Consider Hawke's drunken "conversation" with his wife's tombstone about Hurricane Katrina conspiracy theories, or Snipes' scowling monologue on being "a man." They may be in the film for mere minutes, but RZA and company know how to weave these moments together into something almost special.

Almost. There are pockets of RZA's film where these elements combine to create something both entertaining and poignant. When Isaiah Washington's mortician turns his nose up at a dead body without the proper paperwork, or Cousin shrugs off the struggles of a post-Katrina New Orleans in pursuit of his own greed, RZA's film demonstrates a unique understanding of how class politics and B-movie aesthetics can sneak up on an unsuspecting audience. The shame of his film is that these two halves of the story line up far too infrequently. There is a shorter version of Cut Throat City – one that better blends conspiracy and violence - that would elevate RZA's film. In the end, the film,

like the bank robbers it follows, leaves just a little too much money on the table.

Witches, gunfights, and gore is not a combination found in many Westerns, but perhaps that says more about the genre than it does The Pale Door. In the latest film from Austin indie horror filmmaker Aaron B. Koontz, there is plenty of all three to go around, resulting in a totally acceptable entry into the undersized canon of horror Westerns.

After their latest train robbery goes sideways, the Dalton gang takes refuge in a local town. There, ringleader Duncan (Knighton) and younger brother Jake (Druid) find themselves the guests of Maria (Walters), the local brothel owner and elder stateswoman of the community. As the night continues, though, the gang makes a terrible discovery: Maria and her wards are kept alive by dark magic, and they have their sights set on Jake as their latest sacrifice.

For most audience members, the draw of the film will be the actors. From Bill Sage to Pat Healy, the supporting cast peppers The Pale Door with interesting character choices that consistently elevate the material. Unsurprisingly, Walters reigns supreme, offering grand character elements that never threaten to overshadow the effective emotional stakes. Westerns have long been fertile ground for character actors, and the cast of The Pale Door works overtime to anchor the film in the familial relationships.

As a B-horror movie, The Pale Door holds its own. As a Western, however, the film struggles. Missing from the movie are the sweeping landscapes we associate with the genre. This may be a necessary trade-off on the part of the production team, but there is still something maddening about watching a Western composed entirely of medium shots. Even more frustrating is the soundtrack. More than any other mode of filmmaking. Westerns open the door for iconic and adventuresome scoring. The Pale Door is Exhibit A on how hard a film has to work to make up for a shapeless soundtrack.

In the end, your appreciation for horror Westerns will determine where you stand with The Pale Door. If you are willing to look past the film's genre shortcomings and find happiness in the little things - such as Sage's Creole accent, or several cinematic nods to iconic entries in the genre - you might find the film to be worth your while. Until movies like The Wind or Bone Tomahawk are the norm, a film like The Pale Door is a perfectly acceptable place holder.

D: Michael Almereyda; with Ethan Hawke, Eve Hewson, Kyle MacLachlan, Jim Gaffigan, Rebecca Dayan, Ebon Moss-Bachrach, Haley Elise Pehrson. (PG-13, 102 min.)

If only. That is the story of Nikola Tesla, the man who dreamed the 20th century into existence, and who was cast aside by the corporate forces that enabled but never understood the genius. If only he'd read the contracts, if only he'd made up with Thomas Edison after their famous rift, if only he'd filed his patents earlier, if only, if only, if only. And if only he'd found love. as new biopic Tesla proposes as one of the losses in his life.

The lost love is Anne Morgan, daughter of the investor J.P. Morgan and both narrator and character in this fantastical and formal recounting of the life of the father of AC electricity. It's not been long since the tragically underrated and underseen The Current War - Director's Cut, which put him as the tool deployed and dismissed by captains of industry as they felt fit. Almereyda's biopic is its reverse, trying to find the soul of the Serbia-born inventor, and in this Ethan Hawke is given space like no actor since Petar Božovic in the 1980 Yugoslavian biopic The Secret of Nikola Tesla.

It's a challenge: So much is known of Tesla, but so little is clear. As Morgan - played with heartbreaking and heartbroken grace by The Knick's Hewson - notes, look him up on Google and you'll see the same four photographs, over and over again. He's an enigma, a cipher, too often the charismatic bit player in his own story, like David Bowie's memorable but fleeting turn in The Prestige. Hawke finds him in details and tics, a man never able to bask in success because all that happened was he'd been proved right again, and he was off on another obsession. Meanwhile, Anne recounts how close he came to recognition, and how often it evaded him.

There's a quiet wildness to Almereyda's version of Tesla's life. True, the Marjorie Prime director succumbs to the same magnetic pull as so many other biographers, looking at his American years up to the failure of his grandest experiment, the pioneering broadcast system at Wardenclyffe Tower. But while the era recounted is now a convention, the way it is tackled is far from repetitive. It's rebellious within an era of restraint, bathing Tesla in glowing pastel shades in a time of mahogany, leather, and steam. Whereas Ken Russell in Lisztomania played the past like the present, Anne sees through the fourth wall as the daughter of 19th-century wealth. Historically accurate recreations are interwoven with moments on a stage with back projections. It's all summed up in the year's strangest coda (Hawke mumbling through a karaoke version of "Everybody Wants to Rule the World"); Tesla remains wry yet humorless, emotionally shackled while intellectually unbound. Of course our present doesn't shock them, Almerevda posits. They dreamed it into existence. ***1 - Richard Whittaker

In 2016, South Korean zombie juggernaut Train to Busan was an international sensation. due to its brutal use of swarms of fast zombies, a surprisingly sentimental plot, and a barnstormingly bullish performance by future Marvel Eternal and the gangster from top-notch crime flick The Gangster, the Cop. the Devil. Ma Dong-seok. Director Yeon, who cut his teeth on animation, went back to his illustrative roots with preguel Seoul Station but goes gloriously, bloodily live-action again with Peninsula.

If the end of the original gave you even a dash of hope, forget it. After a bloody and miserable intro loaded with Yeon's signature nihilism, the action leaps four years into a future in which Korea's geography weighs against it. Rather than destroy all the undead, the world has simply sealed it off. Upright soldier Jungseok (Gang) was on one of the last boats out and has washed up in Hong Kong, broke and without a future or refugee status. That's how an American gangster convinces him to head back to the mainland: Zombies don't eat gold or money, and there's an abandoned truck filled with cash in Incheon. Luckily, these zombies are dumb, can't see at night, and are easily distracted, so he's sent in to Von Ryan's Express that booty out by cover of night. Of course, the raid goes south, and his ragtag band finds itself at the mercy of what's left of humanity in Korea. There's deranged Sergeant Hwang (Kim), who loves the chaos and is running a sort of zombie fight club in a basement; loopy Captain Seo (Koo), who may hold the only key to leaving; and Min-jung (Lee), who's survived with her family no thanks to Jung-seok, with whom she has an awkward history.

Less initially mawkish than the first film and more entertainingly overblown, Peninsula keeps to the established paradigm that the living are far worse than the dead, then goes on a gonzo excursion through a wrecked city. Here there are splashes of the Yeon that excoriated South Korean society in the relentlessly bleak The King of Pigs, with Hwang indulging his deranged whims to be the king of Bartertown, er, the docks. What it lacks is a relatable emotional core. The first film at least had failed father Seok-woo trying to redeem his catastrophic parenting skills. Jung-seok is always the brooding hero, so it's hard to buy into his moral salvation – especially since Yeon and co-writer Park Joo-suk make the stakes so obvious (if one adorable moppet wasn't enough for you, how about two?). The operatic denouement is a little soapy, but it's all about the splatter of CGI cars cartwheeling through hordes of gore-soaked ghouls.

"I'm the bad guy?" Michael Douglas asked under the skin of working stiff-turned-directionless vigilante Bill Foster in Falling Down. He was convinced of the rightness of his actions, stunned when it sank in that he was the villain of his own story. For audiences trained to believe the protagonist was automatically the hero, it took a while to understand that they were meant to empathize, not sympathize, with him. There'll be no such concerns about Tom Cooper (Crowe. bulbous and belligerent), the bullying Southernaccented thug who decides to take the bad day of his own creation out on recently divorced Rachel (Pistorius). There might have been an element of support for Cooper when the harrassed single mom cuts him off at a light, but since he was just driving away from murdering his ex-wife and her lover, then burning down the house, sympathy is in short supply. That's when Rachel becomes the target of his abstract wrath at an unjust world that he thinks has let him down, and he's going to teach her a bloody, and predictable, lesson – one that hits close to home after he steals her cell phone and contact list

Director Derrick Borte (The Joneses) came closer to black comedy with similar material in last year's similarly themed American Dreamer. Here, it feels like the points of a much smarter and incisive script are buried under a more conventional hide-and-seek chase thriller - one that Borte executes incredibly well. The path of carnage that Tom wreaks is brutal, and every car crash this lunatic causes, every time he forces someone to unwillingly commit some sin, is an act of pure, bone-crunching force. Crowe, never known for nuance, dispatches all subtlety with this pain-pill-addicted bulldozer of a man, working through some idiotic morality, sometimes even manipulating others into slaughter like some cut-rate Jigsaw Killer.

Less a morality tale than a cautionary one, under the "Chekov's candy-colored craft scissors" rote script there is still some critique of modern culture, and there aren't easy answers: Rachel and Tom are both having terrible days, but that doesn't make their responses equal. When it comes to heroism, one attempted savior gets run over for his act of charity, while an entire diner full of customers stares at their eggs or through their phones as a murder takes place in front of them. All in all, it's a bleak lesson in civility: Don't honk your horn, because you just never know who you're honking at.

Average teen Adam (Plummer) has three friends: the young hippie Rebecca (Robb); the cigar-chomping, baseball-bat-wielding bodyguard (Sebastian): and wannabe lothario Joaquin (Bostick). He desperately wants a fourth in the form of Maya (Russell, Judy Robinson from the rebooted Lost in Space). The only problem is that the first three aren't real. Adam has treatment-resistant schizophrenia, and his first major incident scarred a friend for life and meant he had to change schools, which is where he meets sparky, sardonic, and smart valedictorian Maya.

True teen love never runs smooth, especially when one of you is either dealing with voices in your head or taking an experimental treatment with anal leakage as a listed side effect.

Words on Bathroom Walls is adapted from the novel by Julia Walton and often feels like some of the jagged edges were chamfered off to make the transition to screen easier (sorry, no "polite naked guy" in Adam's coterie of imaginary friends). While it's undeniably ambitious in its aspirations to look beyond the affliction and see the young man, it's also a little superficial in its YA broad strokes and a topic that might have been better suited to a miniseries than a feature. There are sparks of both visual flair, especially in Adam's more complex hallucinations (like Odd Thomas if the demons weren't real), and comedic depth - most notably in the confessional exchanges between the avowedly atheist Adam and Andy García as his Catholic high school priest.

It all rises and falls with Plummer, who grasps that Adam is always out of control, that everything in his life is basically a coping mechanism. His narration – in the form of a therapy session with an unseen shrink - binds the narrative and gives it some direction. That's why it's such a shame that every other character seems so thin. The implication is always that they're trying to break through into his controlled, often misconceived world, but that often means performances serving plot points (most especially Goggins, quietly spectacular as ever, as Adam's stepdad trying to work out his place in the household). Even the voices come so briefly and go for so long that it's hard to always see Adam as dealing with a condition. The sweetness of the romance should be there to help the bitter pill of the story go down, but the dosage is too low to have any real effect.

Moody Amphitheater Rises Out of Waterloo Park

Onlookers can now view the expansive, geometric steel-beam roof of Waterloo Park's still-under-construction Moody Amphitheater from nearby streets. Capacity 5,000, the structure will act as the **Red** River Cultural District's largest concert venue. Due to COVID-19, the opening this fall now shifts to next spring.

Amphitheatre plans unveiled in 2017 thanks to a \$15 million grant from the

Moody Foundation. Then, in February, Waterloo Greenway Conservancy announced a partnership with leading local promoters C3 Presents and parent company Live Nation. which plans to produce up to 35 shows annually in the space under a nonexclusive agreement. The 11-acre park once hosted flagship indie fest Fun Fun (2006-10) and Mess With Texas during SXSW.

"Subject to availability, music programming can be produced by local promoters other than C3," emails Conservancy CEO Peter Mullan. "Opportunities will be vetted by Waterloo Greenway to ensure they work with the overall calendar and are appropriate for the space.

"[The venue] will build upon the legacy of live music, festivals, and public art once hosted at Waterloo Park."

The Moody Amphitheater hides permanent green rooms, dressing rooms, and more production space underground in the adjacent hillside. During a virtual tour last month, Director of Planning and Design John Rigdon said this creative design will allow the park to open for normal public use the morning after a

> show. Concession stands can be sealed off, equipment whisked away, and the

stage becomes a public seating area with stairs leading up to it.

"We've worked with our music partner, C3, to make sure that this is fitted out with all of the infrastructure to put on a largescale show," said Rigdon. "We can raise up lights and screens and

speakers and curtains and everything else. That said, we can also close all that off and have much smaller events."

Beyond music, the stage will also host wellness activities, film screenings, and other multidisciplinary performances. Another virtual tour takes place at 12:30pm today, Thursday, viewable later on Waterloo Greenway's YouTube.





Go Fever and Mayeux & Broussard Bandleaders Leave Austin

Pandemic will cause an exodus of Austin musicians no longer tethered to the city's entertainment economy. Two scene mainstays say goodbye this month: Acey Monaro of Go Fever heads home to Australia with husband/ bandmate **Ben Burdick**, and **Tate Mayeux** of **Mayeux & Broussard** settles in Connecticut. Both artists plan to keep their Austin-launched projects running.

"The band is going to continue exactly as it has been for the last five months," explains lead singer Monaro. "We don't have to live in the same city anymore, [and] we've already been recording and writing in adjacent ZIP codes. We're going to Australia for as long as it takes to be safe in the States to pick up touring."

The couple delayed their preliminary drive to California to record a live set for the Austin Chronicle Hot Sauce Festival, airing virtually Aug. 30.

In March, Monaro got laid off from her office job for a startup, and Burdick gave up rideshare driving and gigs with Star Parks and Otis Wilkins. They head to Newcastle, Australia, plotting an eventual stateside relocation to release a sophomore album recently completed at White **Denim's** studio **Radio Milk**. The band broke the news with a cover of Aussie pub song "Am I Ever Gonna See Your Face Again" by the **Angels**.

"Many different people messaged me like, 'We're thinking about moving too," adds Monaro. "They all say the same thing: 'If it's more expensive to live here than it is somewhere where you can get ahead as a musician, like L.A. or New York, why would you stay in Austin?"

Longtime local troubadour Mayeux now resides outside Texas for the first time in his life. He and girlfriend **Liz Wood**, who sold baked goods locally, took over a waterfront cafe in her hometown of Westbrook. The couple hope to reopen it and integrate live music.

Both worked at **Long Play Lounge**, which Mayeux helped launch as general manager.

"If I was still able to play, it would be a different story," says the Pflugerville native. "I helped open a bar last year and was still playing music full time. With the shutdown, I lost both of those. I didn't see it coming back for a while, and I'm not going to sit around twiddling my thumbs and wasting money on scratch-offs."

He hosted Tuesday night song swaps for years at Buzz Mill, Hard Luck Lounge, and Long Play, which will carry on at South Congress venue Sagebrush. He'll continue writing country songs with Brian Broussard, and plans to come back to Austin for gigs.

"I can't imagine any touring happening in the next year or so," he surmises. "So everyone should try and write and record as much music as they can. I'm excited to sit down and focus on that up there."

R.I.P. Sundance Records' **Bobby Barnard**

A linchpin of the Central Texas record scene, **Bobby Barnard** ran **Sundance Records** in San Marcos for over 30 years. He died from a stroke on Aug. 6 at the age of 67, soon after loading thousands of LPs into his van. His legacy lives on at Houstonbased Sig's Lagoon and local store Groover's Paradise, both run by former employees.

Like at Sundance, which closed in 2012, colorful collages of memorabilia, newspaper clippings, and concert posters line the walls at Groover's. Barnard carefully placed the pictures ahead of the store's opening in 2015. Groover's owner Greg Ellis began working for Barnard as a student at Southwest Texas State.

"Sundance made a cultural hub for the college, but also for all the local teenagers, because none of the other surrounding towns had one," remembers Ellis. "San Marcos has always been off the beaten track as far as hipness goes, and Bobby made such an impact in that little town for so long."



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n attorney representing the landlord of Eastside music lounge Stay Gold threatened its operators with a breach of contract suit totaling roughly half a million dollars. The warning, following strained negotiations, arrived after the tenants were five days late on August rent.

Dan Castro of Castro & Baker LLP sent an email on Aug. 5 informing Stay Gold owners Nathan Hill and Will Tanner that their landlord, David Contreras of El Leon Cantina, Inc., "has chosen to accelerate the rent due for the entire term of the lease.

"You now owe in one lump sum the entire amount that would normally be spread out over the entire length of the lease, plus attorney's fees," Castro's letter specified.

Hill estimated rent for the remaining four years of the lease totals around \$500,000. He and Tanner paid full rent April through July while staying closed because of COVID-19. During extended attempts at renegotiating the lease amid the pandemic, both sides drafted offers the other found unsatisfactory.

Each potential lease addendum involved reducing monthly rent during state-mandated bar closure, though to significantly variant amounts. The landlord's initial offer involved the Stay Gold partners paying the reduction back in full. Castro says he convinced his client to forgive roughly half of that unpaid balance in a followup offer.

Hill described that offer as merely "extending the possibility of us shutting down later." He and Tanner, meanwhile, sought an overall rent reduction that would scale back between 28 and 33% over the next four years. Hill, who co-owns a neighboring bar called High Noon that pays a far lower rental rate, has devoted much consideration to how much debt is worth taking on to sustain a venue during shutdown.

"What really matters is how much time you have left to pay back the debt," he reasons. "At the White Horse [which he co-owns], I still have 10 years [on the lease], so I can still take on debt because I have time to make that back. For Stay Gold, with four years, I have to hope for the best, but plan for the worst, which is that we won't be open until 2021 and maybe we can't have bands.

"By that time, we have three years left and I'll be in as much debt as it took to open the bar originally, when I had 10 years of lease to look forward to and no global pandemic looming."

As Austin's small-business community awaits a wave of evictions, Castro's letter provides a glimpse into possible future scenarios involving landlords.

"Mr. Contreras may not be able to evict you right now, but he certainly can sue you personally for breach of contract, and file a

motion for summary judgment for a quick win," Castro wrote in the missive.

In the same letter, he points out that even if the tenants file for bankruptcy, the landlord will seek to collect on future value of the lease.

"Moreover, if you file personal bankruptcy, El Leon Cantina, Inc. will file an through Sept 30. In the meantime, breachof-contract lawsuits may function for landlords eliminating tenants who can't pay full price amid pandemic.

Speaking on background, a local elected official and attorney versed in eviction law tells the Chronicle acceleration clauses are common, but it's unlikely a landlord would

adversary proceeding in Bankruptcy Court and continue to pursue its breach of contract claim in that court," writes Castro. "Eventually, El Leon Cantina, Inc. will get its money. And eventually, El Leon Cantina, Inc. will rent the building to someone else."

In closing, the attorney informs the lessees his client's latest proposed lease amendment is the last: "I don't need another email whining about COVID. or complaining about how much money you're losing."

An order issued by Mayor Adler maintains a moratorium on initiating evictions be awarded rent for the full lease term.

"The landlord has the obligation to mitigate their losses, so essentially they would need to show that they tried to get somebody new in there, couldn't within this time, then needed to get X amount from the lease," he explains. "So if they got a new tenant in, what they'd probably legally recover would only be the gap period between when they didn't get paid and the new tenant taking over."

Castro contends a judge will award his client a full-term acceleration windfall because of a statement Hill made in an email to Contreras, explaining that it would be difficult for him to find another tenant at this time.

"They shot themselves in the foot because, under normal circumstances, the building owner has the obligation to mitigate losses by getting the building leased," Castro related by phone. "But these idiots sent us an email basically saying, 'You can't rent this to anybody right now' and that's going to be my exhibit A. Motion for summary judgment. Game over."

The Austin veteran in real estate litigation makes no apology for his hostile letter to the Stay Gold operators, portraying the situation as a "poor struggling Mexican against rich white tenants."

Contreras, he explains, grew up in the bar at 1910 E. Cesar Chavez, which his parents operated. He later inherited the building, formerly El Leon's. Rental income stands as Contreras' only source of income for the mortgage payments on his house, states the attorney.

"I haven't done a private investigation on these guys, but they're classic privileged white dudes," the lawver says of Hill and Tanner. "They can do more, they're just trying to take advantage of what, in my opinion, they perceive to be a poor dumb Mexican. They're about to see what'll happen when they do that.

"I find it very symbolic that the bar is located on Cesar Chavez," he adds. "The symbol of poor struggling Mexicans everywhere."

Tanner, who also owns the Hole in the Wall - given an 80% rent reduction by landlords during COVID-19 - finds that characterization hurtful.

"While I believe racism is real and systemic, in this particular situation that's not a part of our calculation and there's no evidence that we've ever treated David with anything but respect," he says. "All I'm asking of him - and he won't have the conversation, but through a lawyer – is to shoulder some of this responsibility. We paid him full freight this entire time, up until August 1, but I feel like we're arguing over how to split a pizza and there is no pizza. We have no sales. So it's not like we're trying to get a better deal. We're asking him to go through this with us."

"People might think that bar owners have a lot of money, but any savings that anybody had has been gone for months now," says Hill. "[Contreras] is asking us how we're going to pay his mortgage, when we're not even paving our own at home. I'm not trying to dehumanize landlords because they're being hurt too, but that burden does need to be shared. It can't just be on the tenant to make sure the landlord is getting full dollar when we haven't sold a drink since March 15."


LUCINDA WILLIAMS

Good Souls Better Angels (Highway 20)

Gone, gone, gone is the impish folkie on the cover of 1980's sophomore full-length Happy Woman Blues. A dozen LPs later, Lucinda Williams sings like said genre's avenging angel. Good Souls Better Angels gives as good if not better as any of its peak predecessors.

Immediate precursors Down Where the Spirit Meets the Bone (2014) and The Ghosts of Highway 20 (2016) clocked double-disc lengths sprawling her most impassioned and inspired work: fierce, angry, alive. Adding another hour atop the pyre, Good Souls Better Angels locks arms with both albums for a discography triad every bit as triumphant and stirring as the triptych following Williams' aforementioned second album: Lucinda Williams, Sweet Old World, and Car Wheels on a Gravel Road. Two decades down the tollway from those name-makers, Bone and Ghosts and now Souls gnash and feedback and bleed with the protean, Mt. Olympus drama inherent in the ancient blues gods of the South.

Adapting native forerunner Memphis Minnie (1897-1973) on defiantly rough-hewn blues starter "You Can't Rule Me," the Louisiana-born Austinite of yore begins by showing off Butch Norton (d), Stuart Mathis (g), and David Sutton (b), her Crazy Horse. Produced by Williams, husband, manager, and co-writer on eight of the album's 12 tunes Tom Overby, and Steve Earle co-conspirator Ray Kennedy, what follows flash fries a page outta 2020. "Bad News Blues" rattles and thumps the daily ticker of quicksand headlines. "Waking Up" addresses domestic violence in a scathing tone with trenchant guitar, and "Big Black Train" steel rails depression.



Free-form disgust and a torture tempo broil bright orange on "Man Without a Soul" ("you hide behind your wall of lies, but it's coming down") and thus pulls an obvious focus, but the boss lady and her henchmen lash Greg Garing's "Down Past the Bottom" to the whipping post, "Pray the Devil Back to Hell" accents Zeppelin-esque and never more so than its Mephistophelian solo. All such sulfur sucks down into glowing ballads including "When the Way Gets Dark" ("take my hand, you're never alone") and seven-and-ahalf minute closer and titular stamp "Good Souls," the longest track and a meditative salve on humanity in need of sentience. - Raoul Hernandez

CINDY CASHDOLLAR

Waltz for Abilene (Silver Shot)

Texas Music HoFer, fivetime Grammy winner, and former Austinite by way of Woodstock steel player extraordinaire



recruits an all-star roster (Larry Campbell, Derek O'Brien, John Sebastian, Amy Helm) and Texas travelers (Ray Benson, Marcia Ball, Omar Kent Dykes), in smoking right out of the gate with Albert Lee on "Foggy Mt. Rock." Cashdollar slides through rockers ("How Many More Years"), songbook classics ("Skylark"), bluegrass ("Ring Them Bells"), and blues both struttin' and burnin' ("Memphis Blues," "This Train). Pure money.

KAT EDMONSON

Dreamers Do (Spinnerette)

As concept albums go, Kat Edmonson's fifth LP is a dream. The now East Coast songstress mes-



merizes across 20 slumber-inspired tunes culled from Disney and American classics. Torqued reworkings like the smoky Arabic rhythm of "When You Wish Upon a Star" are stunning. A dark current lurks under the longing whimsy of the Texan's angelic voice. Two originals stir a late-night mix, the skittering "Someone's in the House" and the scene-stealing centerpiece "Too Late to Dream," pondering if growing up predicates the loss of magic.

WILL SEXTON

Don't Walk the Darkness (Big Legal Mess)

In the decade since his last solo outing. CenTex son Will Sexton moved to Memphis, fought back



from a stroke, and formed the suave grooving Motel Mirrors with spouse Amy Lavere. Darkness thus radiates reaffirmation, even if some songs feel tentative vocally ("Temptation's Call"), Tapping NOLA's Iguanas as backers adds a wicked soulful psych flavor ("What My Baby Don't Know"), while the title track lays down a bluesy uplift and determination and Art Edmaiston's sax soothes on searching closer "Fell in Straight View."

RAY PRIM SEES GREY

Bandcamp

Austin "soulwriter" Ray Prim's latest, the emotive and charging Grey, rests on an admixture of highwayman ramble, countrified blues twangs, signature strings, down-home gospel, and age-old frustrations specific to Black people "Angela Polady" walks down the story of a young pregnant woman by offering little coddling or reassurance that anything in life works out and closes by merely saying, "Try your best to get by, baby," Blooming standout "Too Much to Lose." featuring vocalist James Robinson, starts with a gorgeous piano chord progression and calls for societal changes, which remains the local's core modus operandi. The mix isn't fully welded and a little cold, but the punch and message of the swift LP overcome whatever technical points.

Dominique Woodson taps a winning combo in linking up with producer 1800 Twenty and longtime collaborator Cedd Boss (Cedrick Traylor). The young Austin rhymer name-drops famed New Orleans entrepreneur Master P during a hook about Teddy & Co. knowing no limit to their escapades. Sharp, chordlike synths give way to a chilled out melody, whose simple backdrop strikes well with TTL's propensity for smooth, Auto-Tuned joints implanting thoughts of shrimp and chicken after a few replays. Cedd Boss delivers a short, solid verse where he likens his leadership abilities to that of Master Splinter from the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles franchise.

A three-track flush with strings and brass, Hydnora's top-heavy start earns its keep out of the gate behind the 11-minute "Blue Fog," a thrilling avant-prog contortion inspired by the late-Seventies Rock in Opposition (RIO) movement. The number mingles jazz-pop vibraphone before veering into bass-driven hard prog, Mohadev Bhattacharyya's guitar announcing itself with a neck-length squeal. Free-form instrumentation visits the latter half as the piece circles back around like a musical ouroboros, Alden Doyle's violin ushering the listener on to the next track. "Spaghettification" quickly noodles through the prominent off-kilter riffing of Sam Arnold's bass and Aaron Parks' kit until the EP tapers off with Wha-ha-ha's 1981 romper "On the Floor," a madcap aria mixing Leila Henley's sax and vocals at the fore. - Greg Stitt

CURVED LIGHT: IMPERMANENT

NAYOME GETS *Personal* **Apple, Spotify**

Texas State student and Tyler native Naomi Sutton hit the ground running in Austin, delivering buzzworthy extended play Personal. As Navome, she wraps all of her current and past influences into a single space. Top-notch production supplied by noted standouts Deezie Brown, Sam Houston, Nate Cooper layers her alt-soul and soft raps over various textures that evoke the interiority of lust, love, and the oscillating trials of trust. The singer then adds a Jill Scott-modeled no-nonsense attitude and sensuousness. 


