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





LET GO OF IDENTITY POLITICS AND VOTE

I went on one of my bimonthly pandemic walks with my dad the other day, and he told me he's decided not to vote. Considering the current administration's abysmal response to COVID-19, I managed to only slow my pace for a moment and calmly ask why. His answer: He can't bring himself to vote for Trump, nor any of the other downballot Republicans in Texas, but he also doesn't want our country "turning into a California." His sentiment seems common here in Texas.

as people who are from blue states are moving in at an unprecedented rate. And with that, the belief the newcomers will flip our state blue, and then our economy will tank.

I couldn't argue with my father about the desirability of "turning into a California." The state has some of the highest levels of economic disparity in the U.S. It's also true that increasingly high state

income taxes and regulations are causing businesses and wealthy individuals to relocate to low-tax states like Texas.

NFAR But Democratic policies didn't cause California's economic problems. Rather, the state's history suggests that constituents voted for Democrats in response to problems caused by explosive population growth and an increasing wealth divide. California was a Republican stronghold for almost 40 years before it finally flipped blue in 1992. In the years leading up to that point the state was growing at a rate of 2.5%, one of the fastest in the country. According to the Public Policy Institute of California that's tracked changes in income growth and levels since 1980, the wealth gap started well before California flipped. In fact, the wealth gap was caused by its too-rapid population growth coupled with other Republican policies that still continued to encourage population growth - all while failing to address needs for infrastructure and social safety nets that accompany growth.

Texas is now in the same position as California. Low taxes over the past 40-plus years have culminated in one of the fastestgrowing populations in the country, at 2.68%. Our current public education system ranks in the bottom fifth, and yet our Legislature passed a law last year to limit property taxes without offering alternative funding for schools - exactly like California did in 1978. The housing shortage crisis, not to mention road traffic, are other indicators

> that population growth is in overdrive. The government-sponsored mortgage company Freddie Mac recently reported that "domestic migration is worsening the housing shortage issue in ... high-growth states" like Texas.

Don't get me wrong, I'm still a Texan - I love a big barbecue and I'm cool with guns - but I'd be embarrassed as hell if any of my guests had to fight it out or left hungry ... not to mention I'd want enough time to lay out the checkered tablecloths, pull on my boots, and cue the band.

Texas now needs to tweak and change some of its policies to address infrastructure, or we will end up worse than California. Growth is great, but too much growth too fast is not great. Just like the Federal Reserve implements a wide range of monetary policies to maintain the health of the country's economy, Texas needs to elect candidates who can operate in our current reality, who can focus on problem-solving instead of labels, and who can bring "lessons learned" by other states to our Legislature. The truth is that the wealth divide has already begun. We are already like California. A Republican might say, "But Texas isn't even blue yet!" and he'd be right. Cue the blue.

Seriously, this needs to happen. In other election cycles, we've allowed that some GOP incumbents weren't that bad, or Democratic candidates weren't all that great, and been less adamant about the imperative to vote blue, no matter who. There aren't such choices on your ballot this year, and now is not the time for contemplating a pragmatic bipartisanship, let alone abstaining from the vote, when our house is on fire. The decadent and depraved Republican regime, in D.C. and at our own Capitol, is actively destroying lives and communities and fortunes and futures for no good reason and elevating juvenile posturing and bullshit; nothing it does can or should be used as a model for how we should govern ourselves.

With the stakes growing more existential with every passing WTF day, it's not going to get any better. Now is the time to call an end to this tragic travesty: Democratic power does not guarantee an end to the poverty and inequity and mistreatment and suffering and violence and death, but it's the only place to start.

CITY COUNCIL

District 2: David Chincanchan

Soon after Mayor Pro Tem Delia Garza announced last November that she was stepping down from Council, David Chincanchan and Vanessa Fuentes began their campaigns; they remain the leaders in the four-way race to represent Southeast Austin's D2. They share many of Garza's progressive priorities, and both are focused on similar policy goals to address D2's most pressing issues: food insecurity, flooding, transportation infrastructure, displacement. But Chicanchan's extensive experience at City Hall, in local politics, and in the Southeast Austin neighborhoods where he was born and raised gives him a clear edge. A former aide to both U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett and D3 Council Member Pio Renteria, Chincanchan's institutional knowledge offers him a head start as he navigates the city's most vexing concerns and City Hall's most bureaucratic procedures.

District 4: Greg Casar

Incumbent Greg Casar seeks a third term representing Northeast Austin, and as in his 2016 Council reelection, he enjoys a groundswell of well-earned support from across the community. He has led the fight on many of Austin's highest profile issues since 2014 mandatory paid sick leave, lifting Austin's camping ban, and "reimagining public safety."

District 6: Jimmy Flannigan

Incumbent Flannigan is the clear choice for voters in Northwest Austin. Representing the purplest and most suburban Council district,

Q: How do I check the status of my ballot? A: Visit www.votetravis.com, scroll to the bottom of the page, and choose the "BBM Status" button.

Q: I've received my ballot and I've filled it out. What's the deadline for turning it in?

A: Hand-deliver to the Travis Co. Clerk's Office, 5501 Airport Blvd., through Election Day, Nov. 3. Mailed ballots must be postmarked by Nov. 3 and received by the clerk by Nov. 4. (Officials are recommending that you not trust the mail at this time.) Mail to: Travis County Clerk - Elections Division PO Box 149325, Austin, TX 78714-9325

Q: If I applied for a ballot, can I still vote in person if I so decide? If so, what steps do I need to take?

A: Yes, If you already received a ballot, you may bring it to a polling location to surrender it to a voting clerk. If you don't bring the mail ballot, you'll have to sign an affidavit saying you didn't mark and mail in the ballot; you'll then vote provisionally.

identified with her positions on land use, as one of those who has opposed proposed revisions to the Land Development Code. But she's also been a solid Council voice on issues that go hand-in-hand with that as tools for creating a more equitable and resilient city – environmental and resource management, public safety, and transportation.

District 10: Alison Alter, Pooja Sethi (dual endorsement)

D10 in Central and West Austin includes a number of different communities of interest and has drawn the most contenders (seven) of the Council races on this year's ballot. Voters have two strong and distinct options.

Drawing on her academic background, Alter has proven to be a studious representative, coming to meetings and staff briefings prepared with probing questions. In 2019, she spearheaded an ongoing third-party audit of how the Austin Police Department has (mis) handled sexual assault cases, and in the fiscal year 2021 budget, she secured funding for two new ambulances for Austin-Travis County EMS, along with more medics to staff them. Alter voted against easing the ordinance prohibiting public camping in 2019, out of concern that the city did not have the strategies and services in place to reduce homelessness. She has focused on those efforts since, such as the city's purchasing motels to convert into supportive housing.

Sethi is the strongest challenger in any of the four Council races featuring incumbents. An immigration attorney who has spent time during the pandemic organizing and delivering meals to people without homes, Sethi would bring perspective and experience that's currently not found on Council. Her work on the city task forces that examined systemic racism and envisioned the Office of Police Oversight would be an asset as Council "reimagines public safety." She has also served on the city's Asian American Quality of Life Advisory Commission since 2015; as only the second Asian American to serve on Council, Sethi would give voice to one of Austin's fastest-growing and increasingly politically active communities.

CITY PROPOSITIONS

For the decades since Capital Metro was formed in 1985, it's been trying to take Austin transit to a next level, and Austin has caddishly refused to commit. We've run out of time and excuses to keep pretending our mobility problems will solve themselves. We had the chance 20 years ago to approve a rail system that would be a well-established fixture of urban life right now, and we biffed it. A handful of the exact same people who killed transit then are still trying to kill this

much larger and more ambitious plan - one that's scaled to make up that lost 20 years precisely because it's now So Big. And, of course, because they'd never use it, because they see driving alone as a civil right rather than a privilege, let alone as the oppressive burden it actually is to many Central Texans. They're, if anything, even more averse to spending money on active mobility - sidewalks, bike infrastructure, trails, as well as important safety and environmental improvements - which they see as recreation rather than transportation. Our city's income segregation, inequitable distribution of infrastructure and access to public services, and stillmuch-too-large carbon footprint all tell a different story. It's time for us to get going.

AISD BOARD

District 2: John Mckiernan-González

Texas State professor Mckiernan-González is the "newcomer" among the three candidates in southeastern D2, but he brings a clarity of vision and specific policy ideas that we think will serve the district best. Inspired to run by his opposition to the "School Changes" process, he has prioritized duallanguage and special education in his campaign and spoken to the ways systemic racism has shaped Austin. His outspoken advocacy for the needs of AISD's most vulnerable students and its most disadvantaged district would be a welcome addition to the board.

District 3: Kevin Foster

This UT-Austin professor and educational anthropologist is running unopposed for the seat currently held by Ann Teich.

District 5: Lynn Boswell

All three candidates in the race have similar policy goals – focusing on better communication and more equity in West Austin's District 5. However, Boswell combines time as an AISD volunteer and president of the Austin Council of PTAs with demonstrated success as an advocate for young people and education in other contexts. Her work to abolish the juvenile curfew, to eliminate Capital Metro fares for K-12 students, and to sway the Legislature with Just Fund It TX show she has the chops to raise AISD's issues – maybe even recapture reform – with those who can help make change happen.

District 8: Noelita Lugo

While each of the candidates for this districtwide seat being vacated by Cindy Anderson would be assets to the board and AISD, we're endorsing Lugo's combination of passionate advocacy for AISD families during the controversial School Changes process with professional policy expertise and commitment to equity and anti-racism.

The Big Engine That Must

Proposition A is wobbling around the final curve. We can't let it derail.

The mayor, his fellow electeds, and the city's most visible social justice activist did not assemble in damp 40-degree weather Wednesday morning at Carver Library to celebrate. Proposition A, the Project Connect transit plan, is in real danger of going down to defeat, they fear, hence their urgent appeal via the **AUSTIN** media. "I'm concerned about people [not going] all the way to **AT LARGE** the bottom of the ballot," Steve BY MIKE CLARK-Adler said. "I'm concerned MADISON about the lies associated with this election. I am concerned that people might be making decisions

based on signs [saying] this costs six

times more than what it actually costs. But

I believe and hope that people will actually

find more trusted resources than a sign that they drive by, [and] that most everybody, if they understand the real facts on Proposition A, are going to be voting in support."

I am a wee bit more optimistic about Prop A's chances than the campaign can

afford to be at this point; the responsible thing to do is plan for a close race and a long E-Night. We have endorsed Prop A, as have the Statesman, most environmental groups, the Chamber and other business groups, labor groups, and advocates like the Austin Justice Coalition - a cross

section of backers that should touch most of the city's voters. AJC founder and leader Chas Moore told reporters that by

investing in mobility as a public good and civil right, Austin can live up to the image all of those boosters, and most of us, share of a progressive city that can have nice things: "Prop A is a chance to put our money where our mouth is."

LIES OUR ELDERS TELL US

It is sad that the Prop A campaign has to white-knuckle its way into Election Station, but that's what happens when mean people with too much money tell lies about you. I'm looking at today's fulmination - they come daily, like meditations from the Church of Get-Off-My-Lawn - from Voices of Austin, which is mostly just the voice of elderly politico Peck Young, amplified with the cash of

RECORD-BREAKING BALLOTS As we went to press. 486,206 people in Travis County had cast their ballots in the Nov. 3 general election. That breaks the county's 2016's presidential election total voter turnout of 477.588, which included early voting and Election Day.

MASK UP TO GOTV U.S. District Judge Jason Pulliam has ordered that everyone who enters a polling location in Texas must wear a face mask. The order, issued Tuesday night, voided an exemption for polling locations that Governor Greg Abbott had included in his statewide mask mandate. Unsurprisingly, Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton has said he plans to ask the 5th **U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals** to block Pulliam's order.

SPEAKING OF VOTER SUPPRESSION The Texas Supreme Court upheld Abbott's order limiting mail-in ballot delivery sites in a unanimous ruling delivered Tuesday. The court determined Abbott's order expanded voting opportunities and didn't create a severe burden on voting rights.

THE CALIFORNICATION CONTINUES At press time, Texas was poised to overtake California as the state reporting the most COVID-19 cases nationally, a spot California has held since July. As of Oct. 27, the Texas **Department of Health and Human Services** has reported 874,367 cases since the pandemic began.

HAPPY HOUR AT THE HOME BAR On Tuesday, Travis County Judge Sam Biscoe, in consultation with Interim Health Authority Dr. Mark Escott. declined to reopen area bars, a decision he says he'll revisit in two weeks.

CASIS PRINCIPAL RETURNS Casis Elementary School Principal Samuel Tinnon was reinstated late Wednesday after several days on administrative leave. The district has not provided a reason for why Tinnon, who's served as the school's principal since 2013, was abruptly placed on leave or why he was reinstated, but parents on Facebook have questioned whether the decision is connected to some parents' complaints about the school's reopening plans.

undisclosed donors (hint: police union). Right at the top of Wednesday's release: "When you go vote and get to Proposition A toward the end of the ballot, keep this number in mind, 25%. According to the Travis County Tax Office, that's the average increase in property tax you'll pay on your home every year if Proposition A is approved."

This. Is. A. Lie. And Peck Young knows it's a lie; he'd certainly perform outrage if someone lied like this about his side. Prop A is not even a 25% increase in the city property tax rate, which only makes up about 18% of the "property tax you'll pay on your home every year." In truth, you'll be paying about \$300 a year (at the median home value), less than homeowners pay now to Central Health or ACC, less than we all pay in sales tax for Capital Metro bus service, and less than we pay in both property and sales tax for the Austin Police Department, even after "defunding." Peck Young lies about that too, but at least he's not violating state law when he does that, unlike with Prop A.

Note that VoA just assumes that you-thevoter own a home, which most Austinites don't. The group's slogan is "Awakening Austin's Political Majority," which is also empirically false. Voices of Austin and its right-wing fellow travelers - anti-Prop A PAC Our Mobility Our Future, and other mean rich white PACs like Had Enough Austin? - are the megaphones of the dwindling minority of Rs and centrist Ds that used to run this town and have been upset at the decay of their standing for decades. (Young was running local political campaigns when I was in second grade, and I'm way older than the median Austinite or even the median voter.)

The "political majority" in Austin does not remember the Armadillo and barely

even remembers the 2000 defeat of our first rail transit referendum. The opponents of that plan are still fighting this one, 20 years later, though the city is very different and vastly larger in both land and people. (Those are just facts. Sorry if you find them triggering.) The Voices of Antiquity's continued recalcitrance is both ignorant and immoral; if Austin blows this chance for true mobility equity and a new environmental trajectory. we will have told the world that we want to be an unfair and mediocre place, and our best and brightest and most loving people will and should give up on this city and go elsewhere, and old white goats like Peck Young will see that as a triumph.

THE STATUS OUO IS DEADLY

So why is Prop A wobbling as it rounds this final curve? Because it's a lot of money, and it is a tax increase, and those are never easy. And we are in crisis right now, facing not only plague but economic precarity, especially acute for beloved small businesses. That's because these same people who find transit threatening and nasty have masklessly worsened the pandemic and fumbled the recovery for nearly a year. How much better would financially hurting Austinites feel if they didn't have a car payment? It was these same people who killed the 2000 plan that would, by now, have made that a realistic option. How much better will they feel with good jobs working to build out Project Connect? These same people want to prevent that.

The majority is disgusted and revolted by this venality and is stampeding to the polls in record numbers - all the more reason to deal with Prop A now. "It is a big decision," Adler told reporters. "And when we make a big decision, we need to bring it to an election where ... it feels like virtually everybody in this community is going to vote."

Hancock Golf Park, Take 3

The plot thickens, or thins, or something...

The Hancock Golf Course/Park story continues to take unexpected turns, continuing to revolve more around what's not happening, than what is. The city Parks and **Recreation Department's Golf Division** has been wanting to do something with this underperforming nine-hole course-cum-defacto-public-park for years now. In the continuation of a process interrupted by the pandemic, PARD announced a pair of civic engagement meetings a couple of weeks ago, to be held this week, to present earlier public feedback on its plans, along with a request for proposals to create a public-private partnership to develop and run a "modern golf learning **PUBLIC** center" on the site.

But before they could get to that, the Hancock Neighborhood Association's parks committee had a resolution to present to the NA's meeting last week. which called for splitting the property between golf and parkland.

But before they could get to that, a grassroots **Hancock Conservancy** organization was announced, in the works for a while now and dedicated to turning the entire property into a public park. Just days after announcing their existence, they pitched that alternate plan at last Wednesday's Hancock NA meeting, whereupon the plan from the NA's own parks committee was voted down ("soundly," I'm told). Though the Conservancy was unable to present their own resolution at this meeting for procedural reasons, they're expected to do so in time for the next NA meeting.

Meanwhile, PARD's meetings were still scheduled for Monday and Thursday of this

week; but on Monday afternoon, in a flurry of emails from the department and the city public info office just hours before the meeting was to start. PARD canceled them. "in order to fully adhere to the City of Austin Public Participation Principles," because there were so many people now registered to participate, that it would "significantly limit dialogue opportunities for attendees in the online format." PARD promised to reschedule "additional options for participation, focusing on small group meetings." They'll "reach out to neighbor-

hood and community groups to schedule online meetings," and "groups may also send meeting requests to pard.golf@austintexas.gov. All meetings will be recorded and posted to the project's website" (www.austintexas.gov/ department/hancock-golf-courseplanning).

So that's where we are as we go to press this week. Stay tuned.

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The Home Stretch

Housing casts shadows on Council's preelection agenda

City Council has a brief, 44-item agenda to get through today, Oct. 29, leaving the four incumbent members on the ballot plenty of time to continue campaigning ahead of Election Day.

One item of note is a resolution from Council Member Greg Casar (one of those four) that would reaffirm a city ordinance passed in 2014 that protects Austin residents from housing discrimination based on their source of income - such as a public housing choice voucher (the former Section 8 program). That ordinance was preempted by the Texas Legislature in 2015 (Senate Bill 267), and in 2017 the city sued the state. Since then, lawyers for each have wrangled over what court has jurisdiction to hear the case. In February 2020, the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals dismissed the city's suit; now, city attorneys have petitioned the U.S. Supreme Court to take the case and potentially reverse the 5CA. If that happens, Casar's resolution would authorize City Manager **Spencer Cronk** to renew litigation.

Council had been set to take its final votes on the Kemp Street zoning case in

Montopolis that we reported on last week, but after neighbors refused to withdraw their valid petition against the rezoning amid opposition by anti-gentrification activists, developer Drenner Group has withdrawn its application. The valid petition meant Council would need nine votes to approve the proposed zoning, which four members had signaled in prior discussions they wouldn't do without changes to satisfy the neighbors.

The proposed SF-6 zoning would have supported Drenner's plan for 33 townhomes, 17 to be built by **Habitat for Humanity** and sold to income-qualified buyers for below market rate. Now, the owner intends to go through with the sale to Drenner, which intends to build under the existing SF-3 zoning. That gives the city no leverage to incentivize affordable housing at the site (state law does not allow the city to require affordable units as a condition of zoning).

At the Oct. 15 meeting, where the case was postponed to this week in hopes that an agreement could be reached. CM Pio Renteria, who represents the area, anticipated failure: "I have a feeling that we're not going to be able to get the votes anyway, but I'm willing to go through the exercise. ... And if it does not pass, this would be a nice case study for us to follow, to see what happens to the lot and what kind of housing actually gets built there. It would definitely be an eye-opener for people that have been fighting this."

The 2.16-acre lot, which currently has one singlefamily home on it, will likely be subdivided into five small lots with two units on each, if the site topography allows for it. It is unlikely any units will be affordable to vulnerable Montopolis residents facing displacement; while the Habitat units in the SF-6 plan would sell for \$235,000 or less, a nearby house on Kemp street was listed at \$785,000 the day after Council postponed the case.

For Fred McGhee, president of the Montopolis Community Development Corporation and a vocal opponent of East Austin upzonings, the outcome represents a clear victory over both developers and pro-density CMs. "We reject the framing entirely,"

McGhee said of the Council majority's position that density allows for more affordable housing within mixed-income properties. "Drenner Group should have come to the community and figured out if there was a groundswell of support before moving forward. They knew they were stepping into a

hot-potato situation."

In 2019, Montopolis CDC submitted an application to the Austin Housing Finance Corporation for \$1.8 million in funding to redevelop 508 Kemp with 20 one- and two-bedroom single-family homes, all to be sold to buyers at or below 60% of Austin's median family income (that's \$58,550 a year for four people), the low end of the range proposed by Drenner. McGhee withdrew the application a few months later after AHFC staff expressed no

interest; he said the CDC is standing by and willing to help the current owner if they want to stay in the neighborhood or if they are open to a buyer who would build 100% affordable housing. As of now, though, that does not appear likely.

ICE Targeted Immigrants in Sanctuary With Hefty Fines

U.S. Immigration and Customs
Enforcement surveilled and targeted outspoken immigrants who have taken sanctuary in churches – including an Austin mother in refuge at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church – with egregious fines, emails show. The
Center for Constitutional Rights released the emails as the result of a Freedom of

the emails as the result of a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit against ICE filed in February by local immigrant rights groups, **Grassroots Leadership**, and the **Austin Sanctuary Network**.

Hilda Ramirez – a Guatemalan refugee who fled death threats and domestic violence with her now-14-year-old son, Ivan – faced a staggering \$300,000 fine from ICE in 2019 for "willfully" failing to deport, the *Chronicle* previously reported. The notice listed the asylum-seeker living in the North Austin church and "evading arrest" as an alleged offense.

Advocates and attorneys argued the fines – also issued to others in sanctuary across the U.S. – served as an intimidation tactic and threat to free speech by ICE and the Trump administration against those like Ramirez who aren't afraid to publicly advocate for sanctuary and vocally oppose cruel immigration policies. While ICE rescinded the initial fines in October 2019, in February they reissued notices of intent to fine the sanctuary leaders at a lesser amount. ICE then sent Ramirez a roughly \$60,000 fine.

"Now we learn ICE was surveilling us to punish me with fines for speaking against

the injustices," said Ramirez. "Finally, it's coming to light."

In a plan "years in the making," according to the lawsuit, ICE officials under Trump created a working group to specifically target immigrants in sanctuary with civil fines under an obscure, previously unused immigration statute. In 2018 they crafted a secret policy memo on how to levy those hefty charges. By July 2019, at least

nine people in sanctuary across the U.S. had been fined up to \$500.000 each

by ICE – more than \$3 million in all. The emails also show that ICE closely tracked immigrants in sanctuary with detailed spreadsheets, noting media attention and legal representation.

"We are disappointed, but not at all surprised, by the news that ICE

deliberately targeted individuals in sanctuary speaking out for immigrant rights. The current administration has scapegoated immigrants and retaliated against many movement organizers with the goal of silencing them," Ramirez's lawyer, **Stephanie Taylor**, told the *Chronicle*.

"The public should have no confidence that ICE has the best interest of our communities in mind, or that they can be trusted to tell the truth or be transparent," said Taylor. "The only way to truly protect the rights of the sanctuary leaders is to elect a new administration that values the dignity of all people."

ICE denied Ramirez's deferred-action extension on her deportation last March, but she continues to battle against the order in court.

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
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Safety in Numbers

A guide to the panels working to change APD

The current city budget transfers about \$20 million in funds from the Austin Police Department (freed up by deferring this year's cadet classes) into other services, with plans to reallocate another \$130 million later in the fiscal year (ending next September). To do that work, City Council and City Manager Spencer Cronk have established a network of committees that are working out the details of "reimagining public safety." Here's a brief rundown of who's involved and how.

COUNCIL PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE

Like other Council committees, the CPSC is a place where Council members can get into the weeds with staff on Councilapproved policy initiatives and see what progress staff is making, what kinds of challenges they are facing, and if staff needs more input from Council - all in an open meeting setting. The committee is chaired by Jimmy Flannigan, with Greg Casar serving as vice chair; Delia Garza and Natasha Harper-Madison are the other members.

PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSION

One of the city's 50-ish permanent boards and commissions, this one (first formed in 2009) is the place where Council-appointed volunteers meet regularly (usually monthly) to gather community feedback on public safety concerns; hear from police, fire, and EMS leaders; and discuss new ideas for

Council consideration. Usually, these take the form of policy recommendations voted on by the PSC and subsequently brought to Council agendas by individual CMs. Most recently, the PSC has held public discussions on the future of APD's headquarters at I-35 and Eighth Street after the building is eventually decommissioned – gathering input on both what APD's Downtown presence should be and what the community would like to see in place of a police command center.

COMMUNITY POLICE REVIEW COMMISSION

Established by the 2018 meet-and-confer agreement between the city of Austin and the Austin Police Association, the CPRC replaces the Citizen Review Panel in prior police contracts. The CPRC volunteers, interviewed and appointed by Cronk, will review individual cases of police misconduct and "critical incidents," i.e., excessiveforce cases. Along with the Office of Police Oversight, the CPRC will recommend discipline against officers, as well as suggestions for changes to APD training, discipline, and community relations policies.

REIMAGINING PUBLIC SAFETY TASK FORCE

This group of criminal justice advocates was vetted and assembled by Cronk's leadership team, and will operate alongside a city staff working group to flesh out alternatives to policing where that \$130 million can be reinvested. For example: An audit of 911 calls found that a large number are raised by burglar alarms and that most of these are false alarms that don't require police response. Who, if anyone, should the city send instead? Similarly, if mental health calls are better served by medical personnel, what role should armed police officers play in those situations? The RPSTF will make recommendations on these areas to Cronk and his executive team, who will move to act on them through budget amendments or resolutions approved by Council.

Online or In Person? AISD Readies for "All of the Above"

Austin ISD staff who have received health accommodations to work remotely will have those accommodations honored through the end of the calendar year, according to Superintendent Stephanie Elizalde at Monday night's board of trustees meeting. The announcement comes a week before all AISD students who wish to return to campus will be able to go back to in-person classes on Monday, Nov. 2.

Elizalde had previously said that teachers with health accommodations who are at high risk might be required to return to campus if enough students showed up for in-person learning on Nov. 2. However, at Monday's meeting Elizalde stood firm in the district's commitment to honoring approved accommodations. "We know that [revoking accommodations] would create a hardship on our employees, and they expected in faith that we would continue with those throughout this particular calendar year," said Elizalde. Teachers union Education Austin - which has been critical of the district's ongoing response to the pandemic, including its accommodations process - said it was "glad to see the district make the right decision" Monday.

To date, the district has granted 1,201 accommodations – 756 teachers and 445 other staff. Further details on spring semester accommodations requests are expected to be available by Nov. 9, but Elizalde told trustees Monday that the district is creating a Benefits Review Committee that will prioritize accommodations for the next semester. She said the district recognized there were

some accommodation requests for this semester that were "far more critical" than others, but they were all given the same priority: "Now, at this time, it makes it very challenging for someone who may be coming with a request, because we now are looking at every campus, and whether that's a hardship on that school or not." The district said it plans to work with **Austin Public Health** to help determine what areas represent the highest risks for employees.

The limited number of on-campus teaching staff is an obstacle for

some schools to navigate as students return to campus in greater, yet still unknown, numbers and request different learning modalities. Starting Nov. 2, middle and high

school students will receive more face-to-face instruction, with physical transitions between class periods. Previously, those students took their classes virtually in one classroom, in "pods" under teacher supervision, and parents may request that they continue to do so, adding to teachers' responsibilities.

As of Oct. 22, AISD's elementary school population accounted for the highest percentage of students and teachers attending in person, at 35%, compared to middle school (12%) and high school (8%). Elizalde said district administration will continue to meet with principals and supervisors to develop daily and weekly structures for the return to inperson learning, including exploring using outdoor classroom spaces, but acknowledged no two campuses will look alike as students and teachers return.

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


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Anarchy in the ATX

You don't have to break the law to get watched by ARIC

According to a May 9, 2016, police report, three activists protesting unpaid prison labor hung a banner over I-35 during morning rush hour traffic. Although the attending officer didn't issue tickets and left the scene after only giving warnings for a traffic hazard, he soon discovered one of the protesters had "possible ties to known anarchists." A few hours later, the report, which described the group's political affiliations, was filed with the Austin Regional Intelligence Center.

The "Suspicious Activity Report" was one of a handful about anarchists exposed in BlueLeaks, a recent nationwide hack of information, including from ARIC, a multiagency "fusion center" operated by Austin police. As a response to the perceived failures of intelligence sharing that enabled the 9/11 attacks, centers like ARIC were designed to "fuse" information that could help avert terrorism and criminal activity.

But the reports on anarchists reflect the mission drift that is seen often among fusion centers toward monitoring activity (such as identifying oneself as an "anarchist") that's protected by the **First Amendment**.

In this particular report, the primary subject is described as being "listed as a member of Occupy Austin." They asked the Chronicle to keep their identity anonymous, but they acknowledged being a teacher, a participant with Occupy, and a "local anarchist organizer who has worked with houseless and incarcerated Austinites since 2011." When asked about being "listed," they asserted that "[former APD] Chief Art Acevedo was famous for learning the first names of activists during and after Occupy and either cozying up to or vilifying them."

According to APD Public Information Specialist Tara Long, "The ARIC does not keep lists of members of local political activist groups or lists of members of any other type of group." However, Long elaborated that "initial reports and supplements to offense reports include information that is relevant to that offense report/investigation. Thus, whether an individual [i.e., a witness, com-

plainant, victim, arrestee, etc.] is identified as a member of a particular group or movement may or may not be captured, depending upon its relevance." unclear how Occupy Austin is still relevant after being inactive at least several years prior to the 2016 report.

The banner over I-35 read, "END PRISON

SLAVERY," and was intended to raise awareness of a national prison strike, according to the subject. The report, which lists the "suspicious activity" as "expressed or implied threat," notes that the group was passing out fliers titled, "Take Your Mark, Get Ready, Ablate: 3 Positions Against Prison." However, the report never explains how the "expressed or implied threat" of the banner and fliers are tied to terrorism or criminal activity.

The ARIC portion of BlueLeaks also includes a report about a tweet from "a self-identified anarchist group based in San Marcos" that "issued anti-LE [law enforcement] threat rhetoric" from a now-deleted account. Although an ARIC analyst admitted "no specific intentional threat verbiage was found," the tweet was "documented and shared internally via SAR reporting." The analyst warned, "We may expect further escalation of the group's rhetoric and activity in the future."

In another report, an individual identified as an anarchist had reportedly fired a gun inside his home with children present. The case was "cleared" by ARIC as "Suspicious Unknown[,] because the subject stated that although he does not believe in causing violence or participating in illegal activities he does associate at times with people who do." Two other reports mention subjects as having read The Anarchist Cookbook, which includes bomb-making instructions along with advice on how to smoke banana peels to get high.

Local self-identified anarchist and author scott crow believes the rise of laws criminalizing dissent and financial incentives for enforcement create an environment where law enforcement is "willfully ignorant" of political activism, particularly on the left. Along with the profession's general lean toward conservatism, "self-reflection within law enforcement is very insular and siloed, and so it reverberates with misinformation chronically," crow said.

The ARIC reports show a casualness that differs from documents produced by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, also included in BlueLeaks. DHS consistently includes the word "extremist" after "anarchist" to clarify that the agency is reporting on potential terrorism or criminal activity.

Those documents include a definition:

"DHS defines anarchist extremists as groups or individuals who facilitate or engage in acts of unlawful violence as a means of changing the government and society in support of the belief that all forms of capitalism and corporate globalization should be opposed and that gov-

erning institutions are unnecessary and harmful to society." ARIC reports do not meet this apparent standard of "unlawful violence."

"Law enforcement creates incredibly dangerous climates for real people and real impacts on their lives," crow stated. "It endangers people like myself."

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Making Equity Flow

UT research reinforces anti-racism at Austin Water

Since June, many have wondered if institutions would keep their promises to take a hard look at the ways they reinforce systemic racism and inequality. In one Austin city department, they're taking concrete steps. Austin Water is using research from a UT-Austin School of Architecture study, "Making Equity Flow: Proposals for **Advancing Racial Equity Through Water** Department Practices," to design and implement programs that go to Council for approval this year.

In 2018, the city equity office conducted an audit of Austin Water as part of its citywide equity assessment, which grew into AW's **Racial Equity Plan**. In the fall of 2019. Miriam Solis, an assistant professor of community and regional planning at UTSOA who had been attending meetings at the equity office, began discussing a collaboration with Austin Water's Denise Avery. Solis' graduate practicum researched equity

practices in other major urban utilities, building on AW's plan and culminating in three initiatives that will roll out in 2021.

The first is an expansion of the utility's Customer Assistance Program, AW's "greatest equity priority," according to the "Making Equity Flow" study. Established to give low-income customers discounts on their water bills, its key weakness is that multifamily residents are not eligible. According to the study, "Current eligibility covers customers whose water bill is in their own name, if they live in a residential unit that has its own water meter."

Solis says, "It's actually renters that need the most help," but only a handful of cities in the U.S. include them in their CAP programs. The practicum spoke to those that did and designed recommendations for a bill-credit program based on historical water usage or a deduction from rent, with the utilities communicating directly with tenants rather than landlords. "Those individuals are not, in essence, considered our customers, although they are the end users," explains Randi Jenkins, AW's assistant director of customer experience. "This study identified that gap. So I'm happy to report that we will be taking

an updated multifamily CAP discount forward later this fall to Council to seek approval ... We should be able to roll out that new program in the beginning of 2021."

The second initiative is Phoenix, a recruitment pathway for formerly incarcerated people, which reflects additional challenges due to the pandemic. Austin Water's initial assess-

ment identified a need for training in "interviewing skills, communications, and basic computer skills," says Becky Chen, division manager of safety and technical training. Phoenix, like many schooling endeavors at the moment, is unable to rely on in-person instruction. "Virtual sessions require a high-

er level of attention and focus ... Ideally, training would be done in person and include hands-on interactive components, as well as better ways to customize the training," Chen said. The program may be put on hold until pandemic conditions improve.

The last initiative. My ATX Water. involves advanced metering infrastructure (AMI) or "smart meters" and was included in Water Forward, the 100-year plan adopted in 2018 to prepare AW for climate change and regional growth. Smart meters that can be read digitally at any time will replace all 250,000 analog meters in the city, currently read once a month by contracted meter readers. The program received Council approval in March, and its pilot (5,000 new meters) will roll out this fall. But it may pose a serious threat to affordability; AMI more accurately measures residents' water usage and provides data they can use to adjust and conserve better - but "the median bill ... may rise by about \$10 per month," according to the study. "Even if this is a small increase, we need to account for the cumulative impacts," says Solis, In response, UT's recommendation is that AW be transparent and "explain the reason for any bill increase and the advantages of AMI regarding ... conservation." Austin Water says the AMI team "will review and ... address these increases so that low-income communities are not disproportionately impacted before full deployment begins later in 2021."

This isn't the first time UTSOA has partnered with the city directly; the "Uprooted" report, funded by the city, studied displacement and gentrification throughout Austin, and UT's Center for Sustainable Development researched different scenarios for the old Home Depot tract at I-35 and St. Johns. But applying a racial equity lens to a water

utility is a relatively new frontier. "We're bringing racial equity to a domain of planning work that hasn't historically engaged [it]," says Solis. By implementing UT's research and recommendations, the study says Austin Water "has the opportunity to become a national leader in water equity."

All three program areas are also included in the city Office of

Sustainability's Climate Equity Plan. which is now open for public comment on the city's public engagement website. The Climate Equity Plan is an update that adds racial equity initiatives to the Community Climate Plan, which commits the city to net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.

Big-Name Dems Push Texas Flip

Former San Antonio mayor/housing secretary/2020 candidate Julián Castro and former U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder (founder of the national redistricting-focused campaign All On the Line) will phone-bank on behalf of Democratic Texas House candidates on Thursday, Oct. 29. Kamala Harris will traverse a large part of the state, visiting McAllen, Fort Worth, and Houston on Oct. 30. The Biden for President bus caravan, with plenty of surrogates and maybe a surprise appearance by the Delaware Destroyer himself, is on a three-day, 14-stop tour of the state, beginning in Amarillo on Wednesday, with several stops in the DFW and Houston area, and concluding with stops in San Antonio and Austin on Oct. 30. - Mike Clark-Madison

MJ Votes for MJ (and JT)

U.S. Senate candidate MJ Hegar, who's been holding early-vote rallies all over the state, made a quick trip to her neighborhood

Randalls in Round Rock to cast her own ballot Tuesday. While there, she gave a shoutout to her own state Rep. James Talarico. D-Round Rock, one of the 12 vulnerable freshmen Dems who need to hold their seats for the Dems to flip the House, "He's a servant leader and a public school teacher and he does not want to defund the police," Hegar said, referring to nearby anti-Dem campaign signs making the latter claim. "I guess they're afraid of him, and they should be because he could be governor one day." (At 31, Talarico was the youngest member of the Lege last session.)

As for her own race, while Hegar projected her usual brio and applauded the state's bonkers turnout - though not "the broken state of our voting in Texas, the worst voter suppression" - she said she doesn't pay attention to polling because it's often inaccurate in the Great State. (She is correct.) "I am confident that I'm accomplishing what I set out to accomplish," Hegar said. "I

think we're gonna win. But I also set out to try to help increase voter turnout and civic engagement and enthusiasm because our democracy is in danger."

On the issues, Hegar expressed disappointment "but not surprise" about Amy Coney Barrett's elevation to the Supreme Court without "thoughtfully, actually giving [her] a full vetting" and slapped her opponent, Sen. John Cornyn, for "all of the lies" he's been telling, particularly about the two's respective stances on the Affordable Care Act. "There's just no integrity left there." She got more specifically critical on energy and climate change, noting that Texas is actually losing jobs in the oil patch rapidly and risks losing its leadership on energy if we don't "get on the freakin' train and on board with the future of the industry, [which is] clearly trending toward global renewable energy. where China is leading us, and that's not okay with me." (She did say "freakin'" and not something more coarse, for which she's already taken flak from pearl-clutching Republicans.) - M.C.M.

Flip the House ... and Senate?

While the Democratic goal of reclaiming the Texas House of Representatives and the Speaker's chair for the first time since 2001 remains tantalizingly close, the upper chamber of the Legislature remains firmly (19R, 12D) in the GOP's grasp - or does it? The big prize for Dems would be **Senate**

District 19, the big border district stretching west from San Antonio, where incumbent Pete Flores, R-Pleasanton, prevailed in a special election in 2018 over former state and U.S. Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine. The Dems' nominee this time, who finished a close third in said special, is Rep. Roland Gutierrez, D-San Antonio, who notes that his victory would deprive Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick of the supermajority he needs, by Senate tradition, to bring bills to the floor. Patrick has worked around the margins in past sessions, by tweaking the size of the majority required, by peeling off centrist Dems like Brownsville's Eddie Lucio, and by backing Flores in his upset, but after losing two GOP senators in the blue 2018 wave, his margin for error is narrow. Gutierrez has run more against Patrick than Flores, whom he and the San Antonio Dems view as a stooge: "Elections have consequences and my opponent stole a special election; we must take it back," he says. Sixteen Senate seats are up this cycle; other than SD-19, Dems have an outside chance to flip seats in East Texas and in Houston's southern suburbs. No currently Dem seat is at risk; new Sen. Sarah Eckhardt, D-Austin, isn't up until 2022. - M.C.M.

The Little County That Could

Havs County became the first county in the U.S. to surpass its total 2016 turnout on Sunday, more than a week before Election

Day, according to **Daye Wasserman** of Cook Political Report. Williamson and Comal counties quickly followed suit, and Travis **County** finally cleared the bar Tuesday night. Hays' status as one of the fastest-growing counties in the nation helps explain its huge turnout spike since 2016; the formerly 50/50 county tipped reliably red in the Tea Party wave of 2010, but it swung back just as hard in 2018, when Beto O'Rourke carried Havs by 15 points and Erin Zwiener flipped the HD 45 seat. Now Carrie Isaac, wife of Zwiener's predecessor Jason Isaac (who gave up the seat to run for Congress. losing to Chip Roy in the 2018 primary), is vving to snatch Havs back for the GOP.

... But the Isaacs Have Some Issues

Carrie Isaac helms the nonprofit Digital **Education and Work Initiative (DEWIT) that** claims to connect veterans with digital jobs: both Isaacs sit on its board. The Statesman reported in February (during the competitive GOP primary race that went to a run-off) that the nonprofit "has roughly \$250,000 in revenue but spent less than 1% of it - \$1,200 on veterans." The only other expense the nonprofit reported was Carrie Isaac's salary as its executive director. DEWIT also partners with the company Alegion, whose CEO is a board member, and who said Alegion "has not done any work with [DEWIT] since 2018." Another board member is an investor in Alegion and has made campaign donations to both Isaacs. The nonprofit also shares a phone number with Isaac's campaign. In response to being called out on facts that could suggest at best a growing conflict of interest, Isaac made a "Fake News" tab on her website and called it a "political witch hunt." Remind you of anyone?

TPPF's Fractured Fairy Tales

The Texas Public Policy Foundation, the powerful conservative lobby group with strong ties to the **Koch** network, is spending money on Facebook in opposition to **Prop A**, the mass transit ballot measure. It's not exactly clear how much, though, Facebook lets you see how much an organization has spent on sponsored content in a time frame, and it shows that TPPF has spent over \$500,000 since May 2018 on advertisements; and as of Tuesday night, it had spent \$15,779 just in the past week. But the platform does not break down how much of that spend is to denounce Prop A, compared to the many other positions TPPF promotes. It's also not clear how much anti-Prop A messaging is targeted to persuadable Austin voters, rather than to TPPF friends and supporters throughout the state (and nation). In one cringev video, TPPF's James Quintero pretends to read a fairy tale about a "magical place called Texas, where liberty, laughter, and the love of God filled the land." He adds, "Prosperity was everywhere, except one place: a bad place, a weird place, almost like a blueberry in a bowl of tomato soup. That place's name was Austin." Two questions: Is there actually anyone in town who believes that prosperity exists everywhere in Texas except Austin? And since when is being weird a bad thing? - Jack Craver

Right-Wing PACs Enter Council Fray

Progressive candidates for **City Council**, including the four incumbents, have mostly outraised their conservative opponents in the contest for \$400 contributions, the limit for city races. But the "independent expenditures" of right-wing political action committees with no contribution limits have made

up some of the difference. Four different PACs have raised about \$186,000 primarily to benefit **Mackenzie Kelly** in District 6, **Louis Herrin III** in D4, and **Jennifer Virden** in D10. Both Kelly and Herrin are endorsed by the **Travis County Republican Party**; Virden is backed by **Fight for Austin PAC**, the latest front group launched by TCRP Chair **Matt Mackowiak** to campaign to re-criminalize homelessness.

Fight for Austin raised \$78,765 in the reporting period that covers most of October, spending \$37,917 of it (mostly on cut-and-paste TV ads criticizing incumbent CMs **Jimmy Flannigan, Greg Casar**, and **Alison Alter** for their votes on public safety funding and homelessness). Nearly one-third of those funds (\$25,000) came from **Phil and Mary Beth Canfield**; he's the managing director of GTCR, a private equity firm in Chicago, and a seven-figure donor to UT's McCombs School of Business. (He also dropped \$1,000 to help the anti-Prop A PAC **Our Mobility Our Future**.)

Although **Had Enough Austin?** only raised about \$60,000 through Oct. 25, it spent \$129,609 and still has \$208,478 on hand. The group has only existed for three weeks but has several \$10,000 donors; it opposes Alter without picking a D10 alternative, while backing **Casey Ramos** in D2 and Dr. **Jennifer Mushtaler** in D6, both fervent supporters of the land use status quo. The PAC's spending included \$93,162 to Aro Group LLC, a consulting firm run by **Michael Searle**, an aide to former council member and current minor right-wing celebrity **Ellen**

Troxclair who also ran the dark money campaign backing 2018's **Prop K**, the failed citizen initiative to subject Austin to an outside "efficiency audit." Ramos and Mushtaler also have the backing of **the Positive Change PAC**, another group supporting NIMBY candidates for Council.

SafeTX PAC has styled itself as a "non-partisan" group concerned with public safety, but one of its largest donors is Gary Farmer, president of Heritage Title and a longtime leader of both chamber types and local GOP donors. He's also contributed plenty to Fight for Austin, Had Enough Austin?, and Our Mobility Our Future. The safety PAC raised about \$28,500, spent \$12,954, and still has \$24,000 left to spend.

On the other side, **Austinites for Equity**, which is supporting Flannigan, Alter, CM **Leslie Pool**, and D2 candidate **David Chincanchan**, has raised just \$27,140 (including \$4,000 from Mayor **Steve Adler**), most of which it's spent. A bigger player is the **Workers Defense Action Fund PAC**, which aggregates contributions from labor unions as well as individual donors; it has more than \$75,000 on hand to support Chincanchan and **Pooja Sethi**, challenging Alter in D10.

A Contest at Del Valle ISD


Four of the nine Del Valle ISD Board of **Trustees** seats are up for reelection this vear, but only one incumbent. District 2 Trustee Damian Pantoia, has drawn a challenger, David Albert. Pantoja was appointed by the board in 2019 to replace high-profile leftist activist **Debbie Russell** when she stepped down; Albert was one of the other two applicants, and he told the Chronicle he thought "the right thing was to let the people decide" in this election. The ACC instructor, who leads the college's faculty union, is running on a pro-labor platform and has been endorsed by the Del Valle Education Association and Austin Central Labor Council (of which he is a member). Albert argues his political experience will prove essential for advocating during the 87th Texas Legislature, where the state's education budget will likely face deep cuts in the wake of the pandemic. If reelected, Pantoia, who grew up in the neighborhoods he represents, will continue to advocate for Del Valle ISD residents as the district responds to COVID-19, prioritizing remote technology access, food distribution, and free to low-cost immunizations. "If you go east of highways 71 and 183," he said, "there's no major food market, there's no access to any medical resources, there's no clinic, they don't have anything. So the community relies heavily on - Beth Sullivan this school district."

Lightning Round!

Capital Metro is offering free rides across the entire transit network to people voting on Election Day. MetroBike is also offering a free 24-hour pass during the remainder of the early vote period and on E-Day. Visit CapMetro.org for details... Gov. Greg Abbott raised about 10 million eyebrows this week by activating 1.000 Texas Army National Guard soldiers to deploy to the state's major cities before Election Day, without explaining why or telling those cities in advance; the Guard says the troops will not be stationed at polling places but are on standby to help in the event of unrest (over the election outcome, one presumes)... Michael Bloomberg's super PAC, Independence USA, will spend millions of dollars on anti-Trump ads in Texas in the sprint to Election Day... On Wednesday, Cook Political Report joined NBC News in moving Texas into the "Toss-Up" column in the presidential race. The Economist and FiveThirtyEight still have Trump slightly favored to win the state.

With Joe Biden Portrait Tote bags have never been just about lugging groceries. They're a declaration - a once-blank canvas on which we signal our passions, our politics, where our donation dollars go. In the case of Austin artist Rick Fleming, tote

bags also turned out to be his ticket to meeting the guy

he hopes will become the next president.

The journey began back in May, when Lucy Gross and Katie Stahl launched the Commission Project as a way to keep connected to artists affiliated with SAGE Studio, the Eastside studio and gallery for artists with disabilities that the duo founded in 2017. Soon, several artists began taking on custom commissions, Gross relates, with Gav Sears specializing in line drawings of homes and buildings, Sam Eiler creating portraits using Sculpey, and Fleming, who excels at pop culture portraiture, drawing famous figures on tote bags.

Through the Commission Project, Fleming paid homage to the likes of Dolly Parton, Whitney Houston, and Leonard Cohen, but it was his double-sided tote touting the Democratic presidential ticket of Joe Biden and Kamala Harris that caught traction on social media. The Biden campaign got in touch, which led to a Zoom call in early October between the former vice president and Fleming. They both had news to share: According to Gross, Fleming "got a chance to tell the VP how he has personally donated a portion of his art commissions to the campaign," while Biden took the opportunity to offer the artist his biggest platform yet - a spot in the official "Team Joe" campaign store, where as of this week you can now purchase Fleming's Biden tote bag portrait.

One of Fleming's Dolly Parton portraits is currently running in "Home Makers." SAGE Studio's homethemed virtual exhibit featuring the work of 18 artists with disabilities from around the world. (Check it out soon: the exhibit closes Oct. 31.) Like so many other galleries, SAGE has sought ways to innovate during the COVID-19 shutdown. Early in the pandemic, they relocated operations to Canopy Austin, but the studio where artists gather and get support from Gross and Stahl has had to stay closed; Gross says they've made supply deliveries to artists at home and check in weekly via Zoom. (The gallery is open by appointment only.)

Next up for SAGE? Another virtual exhibit in November, this one running as part of Austin Studio Tour, this year's evolved version of E.A.S.T. "It will be a solo show featuring Sam Eiler and his incredible puppets," Gross says. "People will be able to see 10 of Sam's puppets through an interactive exhibition on our site and have an opportunity to enter a raffle to win a custom puppet made by Sam." - Kimberley Jones

Photographer Randal Ford Captures Some Good Dogs

Some photographers might bristle at the prospect of working with a Bengal tiger, a grizzly bear, and an African elephant in a contained studio. But for professional portraitist Randal Ford, shoots like these are just another day at the office. The Texas native has spent over a decade artfully capturing beasts of all shapes and sizes, including exotic creatures like black leopards, chimpanzees, lions, sloths, and many more.


Shortly after graduating from Texas A&M's business school, Ford became interested in shooting portraits of animals while working on an ad campaign for a farming magazine in rural Texas, where he was asked to shoot intimate photos of dairy cows. "They wanted to photograph these cows with a bright colored background, kind of like how I was photographing people at the time," he says about the project. "They wanted to really humanize them and show off their soul and their personality, so to speak."


This visible personality is one of the unique qualities of Ford's approach - he rejects traditional conventions of outdoor wilderness or nature photography, instead choosing to shoot these animals as if they were human subjects, in a brightly lit studio, looking directly into the camera lens. "I've always loved animals." but I've never wanted to be like the Nat Geo guy that goes out into the wild and takes photographs, it just wasn't my thing." He explains the reasoning behind choosing this particular portraiture style: "I got into photography because I loved creating an image, more

than just keeping it. So I like bringing all these elements together to create this portrait instead of just capturing a picture of somebody or some animal." Depending on the animal. Ford often works with a large team of trainers and on-set crew to help create the final product.

Ford has built an illustrious career shooting covers for Texas Monthly and Time magazine, as well as material for various advertising campaigns. His newest proiect showcases 150 different breeds of dog in a 188page book much like his first photography book, The Animal Kingdom, which featured 150 images of different wild animal species. While his last book was a lengthy process made up of photographs taken over a period of 10 years, Good Dog was shot over just six quick weeks across three cities (Austin, Dallas, and Los Angeles). It features a mixture of professionally trained, rescue, pet, and therapy dogs, along with a portrait of Ford's own pet, a labradoodle named Rosie, as well as a surprise Easter egg portrait of his cat (the only non-canine animal in the book).

Through his art. Ford hopes to convey the sense of intimate connection that he feels animals - particularly dogs - share with humankind. "I think if there's one really important thing about my work, it's that it's meant to engage the viewer. We're meant to look into these animal portraits and see something that moves us, see the essence of these animals, and, I also think. see the essence of ourselves." - Naomi Brady



BETWEEN A ROCK AND HOMOPHOBIC PLACE. Last Friday LGBTQIA and disability rights advocates and

lawmakers spoke out against the **Texas** State Board of Social Work Examiners' recent move to slash nondiscrimination protections from its code of conduct. At a virtual press conference organized by the National Association of Social Workers Texas chapter, members of the **Texas House LGBTO Caucus. Coalition** of Texans with Disabilities, and Equality Texas called on the board to repeal the revision - put forth by Governor Greg Abbott's office - that would allow social workers to discriminate against clients on the basis of

a client's sexual orientation, gender identity,



gender expression, or disability. As Friday's speakers pointed out many times, the move is an intentional effort to roll back existing statewide protections.

Abbott's office gestured at the revision aligning with statutory law (blah blah blah), but hostility toward queer and trans rights in the Lone Star State isn't new. The push for 2017's discriminatory "bathroom bill" was largely hard-right GOPers at the Capitol reacting to an Obama-era directive for public schools to allow trans students to use bathrooms aligning with their gender identity, and indeed much of Tr*mp administration's unrelenting fight to degrade protections for LGBTQIA people, especially for trans folks, has worked to undo Obama-era policies (again, existing protections). It is, in the most literal sense, the undoing of progress. On Tuesday the Texas Behavioral Health Executive Council, which oversees the board, reversed the rule change. Still, one council member and actual social worker. Tim Brown. insisted the change wasn't meant to be discriminatory, but rather a result of being "stuck in the proverbial rock and a hard place." (What?) The group's seeking a legal opinion from the Texas A.G., and we all know how Daddy Paxton feels about us gueers, so yeah, the battle isn't over yet. But as I've said before, we're here, we're queer, let's vote the bigots out (tho Paxton won't be up until next year.) And remember the Pride at the Polls I told y'all about? They tell me that if you tag your voting selfie with #prideatthepolls on IG they'll share it on the 'Gram.







No Room for Hopelessness

How YA author and Texas Teen Book Festival keynote speaker Elizabeth Acevedo writes toward the positive

About halfway through Clap When You Land, protagonist Camino Rios reflects, "I remember that to walk this world / you must be kind but also fierce." Kind, but also fierce. It's one of countless wise and lyrical lines that make up Elizabeth Acevedo's most recent novel. It's also an apt way to describe one of the guiding principles for this author's writing, work, and life.

In 2018, Acevedo won the National Book Award for her novel in verse, The Poet X. Since then, she's released two more novels: With Fire on High in 2019 and now, Clap When You Land, both to critical acclaim. In addition to her publishing success, Acevedo has used her voice to persuasively advocate for greater representation in young adult literature. She is adamant about the need for a more diverse canon, one, in particular. that does a better job reflecting the diverse experiences of Black and brown kids.

Clap When You Land, also written in verse, tells a story from the alternating per-

spectives of two sisters: Camino, who lives in the Dominican Republic, and Yahaira, who lives in New York. The two learn of each other only after their father dies in a plane crash. In the wake of this tragedy, Camino and Yahaira must reckon with long held family secrets as they mourn for their father and begin to make sense of his complicated legacy. Like all of Acevedo's work, Clap When You Land is about a lot of other things, too. It's a meditation on home and place, an exploration into private and collective grief, and, most essentially, a loving, intimate portrait of what it is to grow up.

Acevedo is a keynote speaker at the 2020 Texas Teen Book Festival, so we connected with her to talk about her latest work.

Austin Chronicle: My favorite thing about Clap When You Land is its main characters. Camino and Yahaira are such deep, complex, smart people. I feel like I know them. How do you create the people in your books? Elizabeth Acevedo: Every character is a different amalgamation of imagination, memory, referential people in my life, and general observations I make. Some characters might be more heavily reliant on my experiences and relationships. Some char-

acters I don't know at all. I need to give them a secret or blow something up in their life to see how they react. So much of writing for me is listening to the dissonance in characterization and then trying to figure out how the chords should sound.

AC: Do you start with plot or characters? I know you've said you wanted to write about the Flight 587 tragedy. With this novel, did you also have in mind that you wanted this to be a story of these two young women?

EA: Perhaps neither plot nor character, but premise and the right figure to best push at the constraints of the premise, if that makes sense? I am definitely character driven, but I like to have a meaty hook as the foundation, even if I may not be sure where I'll end up. In this case, I've been doing research on Flight AA 587 for years, and looking at my notes and articles I was struck by how plainly certain secrets were disclosed after folks had died. And then characters began taking over the premise, but I didn't know when I started that these two young women would be at the heart of the novel. The idea came from reading and imagining and trying to find the plot hangers I

AC: Clap When You Land is written with alternating, dual narratives. How did you go about writing in this style?

needed on which to hang the story.

EA: Well, this is where it gets interesting. Initially, the entire novel was written from Yahaira's point of view. In fact, the first draft wasn't even with a sister as the sibling, it was a whole older brother. I was telling [the writer] Ibi Zoboi about the story, and she told me in no uncertain terms that the other sibling needed their voice heard. And well, it was all over from then.

AC: Something I really appreciate about your work is how seamlessly - but also, I *imagine*, *intentionally* – *you weave in ways* your characters experience living under systems of oppression: racism, patriarchy, capitalism, etc. I'd love to know how you

approach including and describing these intersectional experiences in their lives.

EA: Ah, thank you for this question! I work to craft characters that are observant of their world and cognizant of their place in it, without imposing my own views or messages. Let the character tell you what they see and sense and let the reader grapple with those experiences, that's my M.O. I was a young person who was very aware of politics and societal issues and strife: I knew at a young age the disparities that exist between

> different groups of people in this country and elsewhere. It feels important to allow young readers to see some of those systems of oppression lived [and] survived plainly, unflinchingly, on the page.

> AC: Do you think about your characters after you've finished them? I'm curious if you've wondered about how they would handle our current moment. I would imagine they'd have joined in the protests this summer. What do you think?

EA: I miss them after a novel is published. After I perform

the audiobook, I don't reread the novels, so it's almost like I truly close the chapter. But I'll be at the grocery store and think, "Oh, Emoni would be tickled to see starfruit," or I'll be talking with a cousin and think, "Ugh! If only you'd said this a year ago, that would have been the perfect line for Camino!" Ha! But no, I didn't think of the characters in terms of this last summer. This last summer was so heavy, and hard.

AC: I've always found your writing to be so hopeful. As an adult, getting to read about smart, loving, passionate young people like Camino and Yahaira makes me feel like maybe we aren't as doomed as it can feel like. What are you doing at this time to sustain hope?

EA: Thank you. I work toward hope and I find it pivotal in the works I write for young people; tenderness, I think, has to be at the center of these kinds of stories. I do affirmations daily that help me feel more grounded. I've been listening to a lot of musical acts like Chika, Sir, Teyana Taylor - soulful music that just gets me so hyped there's no room for hopelessness. I've also gotten off of Twitter and Facebook and limited my Instagram usage to an hour a day tops. My curtailing the doomscrolling has made a huge difference, and it's made me a lot more intentional in terms of the content I want to put onto my own social media. ■

Running

by Natalia Sylvester, Clarion Books, 336 pp., \$17.98

Mariana Ruiz assumes she has no power. It's not a baseless assumption. The Cuban American protagonist of Natalia Sylvester's YA debut, Running, has had her life determined by her father's political ambitions for many years, and now he's a presidential candidate in the Republican primary. She's endured media train-

ing and changing schools and sees nothing but invasions of privacy in her future, whether it's national news segments or blatant stares in high school hallways. She doesn't see how she can change anything that's happening to her.

While the circumstances of Mariana's family life are singular, her sense of helplessness and the centerpiece of the novel - a heated, mile-a-minute election cycle with a public health crisis looming over it couldn't feel more immediate. We understand the stakes immediately and recognize the

siren song of not reading the news because you're pretty sure you won't like what you see. But Running's fast pace and clear eyes keep us from wallowing too much in comparisons with the here and now - it's enough that as Mariana slowly expands her friend group and her ideas about what she might be capable of, rooting for her feels like a genuine investment in hope for our own reality.

Mariana's disillusionment with her father's policies and her environmentalist awakening come courtesy of fellow students who unexpect-

edly defend her in the wake of a minor scandal, and Sylvester's admiration for young activists for climate change and gun control shines throughout the novel. But Running deftly avoids the trap of "the children will save us!" thinking, which so often condescends to youth or ignores adult responsibility. The institutional power the teens in the novel run up against is huge and unwieldy and very real, and it cannot be unraveled in a day. At the same time, Sylvester lets Mariana's first steps toward using her voice

> feel scary and full of meaning. Both things get to be true - a single action doesn't solve a complex problem, but that doesn't diminish the profundity of the journey to that action.

So much of the best YA is about the discovery of just how huge and tangled and mysterious the world is, and Running manages to be about growing up in so many different ways. It's about the end of a childhood where you can take a grownup's assurances about how the world works for granted, about unspooling the mythos your parents have pre-

sented about themselves, about learning to really say "no" to people you love, about the work of making friends, about deciding what story you're going to tell about yourself. It's about the fact that the political can't be separated out from the personal and we'll never really understand what goes on in the heads of everyone around us, even people we love dearly. But we can reach out to them in understanding, can articulate the harm we see and reject it, can not just imagine but demand a better world. It's a joy to watch Mariana seize that power. Rosalind Faires

A Different Ascent

Blue Lapis Light's Beyond the Clouds brought its dancers down to Earth but still managed to lift us up BY ROBERT FAIRES

At first, the scale seemed strangely off for one of Sally Jacques' Blue Lapis Light productions. No 20-story buildings with dancers racing across its glass face. No towering smokestacks with dancers twirling sky-high around them. No mammoth power plant with dancers spinning through its cavernous insides. No river with dancers bungee-bouncing the full height of the building facing the water. Here was just a modest meadow between a gently sloping hillock and a small grove, the only structures on it a handful of open-sided stands just 5 feet tall. The company had made the bold move of creating a live performance in the midst of a pandemic but looked to have sacrificed the grandeur and epic qualities that have become its signature.

Then, as the dancers emerged from the trees and approached the stands, it became clear that this dance, Beyond the Clouds, was not made for spectacle but for this specific moment in history. It wasn't just that the dancers were wearing masks. Once

they were atop the stands – all spaced so the dancers were fully separated – they had scarcely enough room to move, were able to dance only a few steps in any direction. And when they lowered themselves under the stands, they couldn't even stand up completely. The spaces took on the feel of cells: isolating, confining - much as our homes and apartments have come to seem since March. This emotional toll of guarantine was evoked even more strongly when the group dance transitioned into a solo. Sunny Jun Shen was then literally alone before us, and he brought his natural expressiveness and artistry to embodying the frustration and anguish and yearning that have overtaken us in our forced seclusion. In one moment, he lunged toward audience members closest to him, pausing within several feet, arms outstretched and face

turned to them, the picture of someone desperate for human contact. In another, he knelt and scooped up handfuls of dry grass. rubbing them over his face, relishing the sensation of something natural on his skin – or perhaps only dreaming of that freedom from detachment, for later he resorted to embracing himself.

Separation has long been an element in dances Jacques has created with Blue Lapis Light. Often, two of her aerialists dancing on the sides of high-rises will spin and twirl in close proximity, reaching out to each other but unable to touch. Only in the resolution of the dance will they finally make contact. No such contact took place in Beyond the Clouds, though. Whether Jacques


> was acknowledging the uncertainty surrounding the coronavirus' longevity or just the realities of making dance in this contagious environment, the dancers here never touched.

That's not to say there was no resolution in the dance, however. But its form was spiritual rather

than physical. In one segment, longtime company member lyry Newsome appeared, alone, his hands held up in the way that signals to police he isn't carrying a weapon. Because Newsome is Black, his gesture conjured an immediate association with the many murders of Black Americans by police and the resurgence this year of Black Lives Matter. His movements that followed kneeling; his right hand closing into a fist and rising; his left, still open, coming down to rest over his heart - spoke to another plague in our country, one that has also taken too many lives and shows no signs of abating. Newsome turned and left, but toward the end of the performance he returned, alone again but with a different aspect. This time he radiated peacefulness, prayerfulness, and his gestures were, or were like, mudras, the

sacred hand gestures seen in images of the Buddha. Newsome appeared to have found a way beyond the travails and tragedies of the earthly. As other dancers came back to the space, they adopted similar gestures and projected similar serenity – even those who returned to the stands, both above and below.

The sight of so much peace of mind among so many prompted me to sigh behind my own mask. And as the dancers returned to the grove, my eyes turned to the night sky and the vast space above. In this work from Blue Lapis Light, no one had soared into it, and yet all had ascended just the same.



The **Day of the Dead** celebration in **San Antonio** is going to be lively but with accommodations for the pandemic. This year's colorful river parade will happen virtually. The giant painted skulls or *cráneos* that were the centerpieces of the floats are appearing around town.

Last year's inaugural water parade attracted more than 50,000 to the **River Walk**. This year's parade happened secretly in the early morning hours of a Sunday and was filmed by local television station **KSAT** for broadcast on Friday, Oct. 30, at 8pm. Links to the broadcast will be available at www.dayofthedeadsa.com.

Holding a public event just wasn't feasible because of the coronavirus pandemic. **Johnny Hernandez**, the owner of a string of local eateries and co-producer of last year's parade, found a workaround. The prerecorded televised event features 20 floats with the skulls painted by local artists.

Día de los Muertos is a traditional Mexican holiday celebrated Oct. 31 through Nov. 2, **All Soul's Day**. The observance is a time to remember and honor family members who have passed away. Family members build altars, enjoy the deceased's favorite foods, tell stories, and say a prayer for loved ones.

The painted cráneos are a common symbol of the holiday. The colorful skulls appearing on the floats represent personal themes to the



artists. There's one dedicated to the artist's grandmother, another to Justice **Ruth Bader Ginsburg**, and another to victims of **COVID-19**.

The Day of the Dead parade in San Antonio happens virtually on Oct. 30, but the painted skulls will be on display around town at least through the first weeks of November. For a list of locations, go to www.dayofthedeadsa.com.



"I am a great believer in luck," the writer Coleman Cox observed back in 1922. "The harder I work, the more of it I seem to have."

And ain't that just the truth, citizen? So you know that, when some successful person tells you they've been really *lucky*, usually what they're being is politely humble. Unless that person happens to be Austin's own Stephen Shallcross.

Which is not to say that Shallcross isn't humble or that he doesn't work his ass off, because he is and he does. But when he tells you that a lot of what's brought him to where he is in this town – he's the man in charge of

the acclaimed 2 Dine 4 Catering company and its Swoop House headquarters and Supper Friends dinners and Happy Foods pivot, the Sawyer & Co. diner with its classic breakfast noms and perfectly constructed patty melt and authentic New Orleans entrees, and the new Sawyer-adjacent De Nada taco emporium – when Shallcross tells you he's been lucky, the circumstances of his fortune are sometimes sufficiently jaw-dropping that, yeah, he's not just being polite.

Consider, for example, the land that Swoop House occupies on Gonzales Street. "It's really the only smart *professional* thing

I've ever done, and it was a total accident," says the hospitality honcho, who came from Baton Rouge in 1990 to attend UT and started out, with the help of friends Happy Adelbaki and John Haug, running food service for several Greek houses on campus.

"I wish I could say, 'I Could See the Eastside's Potential, So I Invested in Commercial Real Estate!' But what I did was lease space from a guy who was going bankrupt. That building" – he gestures across the property – "was Metropolitan Bakery at the time, in 2000, and so we were paying rent to him, but he wasn't paying the landlord. So

he was evicted, and all my stuff was still in the building. So I meet the landlord on the courthouse steps, basically, and say, 'Please-please-please, lease the building to me, I've been paying the rent!' And he was like, 'I'm just not interested in leasing it anymore.' And my heart sank, thinking okay, I'm out of business, because this guy technically owns all my stuff now. But he said, 'I won't lease it, but I'll sell it to you.' And I was like, 'Really? I, uh, I don't know if I can do that.' And he was like, 'Well, we'll work it out.""

Shallcross smiles, relating this story at a table in the quirkily appointed gardens outside Swoop House. He's masked for this interview (we're all masked; there's a pandemic going on) but his eyes are definitely smiling. "And the landlord's name was John Lewis, and I can't tell you how many times I've thought of him over the years. Because he owner-financed what we couldn't qualify for, and – because of John Lewis – I've been able to do everything else that we've done. And by leveraging that one purchase, it helped us buy these other lots. It helped us buy Sawyer & Co."

Or consider Swoop House itself, that elegant example of early 20th-century architecture wherein are staged the sort of guest-chef dinners that leave people talking about the experience for years and where the new take-away operation Happy Foods is serving up healthy goodness seven days a week. Why is the place called Swoop House, anyway? Did it just, like, swoop down one day and there it suddenly was? Ha! OMG, what an idea, right?

Except it's true.

"Traditionally, as a caterer, I wasn't busy during the summertime," says Shallcross. "And so one day I answered an ad that said 'Free Garage Apartment,' and then I forgot about it. And a few weeks later, I got a call from this very sweet lady who said, 'Well, the first person didn't come and get it, and you were the second person. So I'm calling you, and you can have it if you want it." And I'm like, 'Well, that's wonderful. What are we talking about?' And she's like, 'It's a garage apartment.' And I'm like, 'You're ... giving away a garage apartment?' And she said, 'Well, the city is making me take it down.' She lived on Caswell Avenue in Hyde Park, and she had this really magnificent old house that her father had built, and there was a garage apartment that had fallen into disrepair and been condemned by the city. So, being the good Eagle Scout that I am. I start to tackle the project of demolition. Because there was a cool castiron bathtub in there, and a lot of old wood that I could use. I already owned a 100-year-old house, so I had a little experience, and the wood matched my own

house pretty well. But, with the demolishing, I was really in over my head; it's a miracle that I did not die." He pauses, lowers his mask for a sip of coffee.

OK, but that was an apartment and it was being demolished; Swoop House is an entire, well, house. I point this out to Shallcross between bites of a Happy Foods spring roll bowl that's making my mouth very happy indeed.

"Yes," he says, "but while the demolition was going on, somebody was driving by, and they stopped and said, 'So, you do demo?' And I was like, 'Apparently, I do.' The guy worked for David Weekley Homes, and he said, 'We've got a house that needs to be demo'd - let me show it to you, it's just a few blocks away.' So I rode over with him and looked at the house, and I was like, 'You want to tear this down?' And he said, 'Well, you can move it, if you want, or whatever.' And I was already planning to build an office for 2 Dine 4 at the time, so I went to our architect and was like, 'Stop! Come help me sketch this - it's a big house I'm going to move!' It was the most expensive free thing I've ever gotten, and I remember telling my wife at the time, 'Hey, I got a free house today!' But I hired Junior Brown to move it, and he was awesome, and it was really a fun adventure to move the thing, to get it from Hyde Park to here. My absolute favorite moment was riding in the house, waving to our neighbors, like 'I'm moving in!"

And then, of course, it was just a small matter of getting the proper building permits for everything.

But, if you've ever tried to run a business or remodel a property in Austin, you'll know I'm mugging sarcastic with that "a small matter" phrase. Still, Shallcross relates his challenges almost cheerily.

"When the economic downturn happened in 2008 and all our destination catering just disappeared in 2009," he tells me. "We'd been setting up events in Cabo San Lucas, St. Lucia, Costa

Rica, and Pebble Beach and so on, and when all that went away, we had to re-focus on catering in Austin. And when we originally got the permits for the Swoop House, it was supposed to be permitted as an office. But I'd had the architects write Tasting Area on the dining-room area on the building plan, and when we went to the plan review, the reviewers said 'Oh, so you're a restaurant.' And I was like, 'No, we're a catering company. Occasionally we're



gonna bring in brides and grooms for sampling, yes, and we'll bring in food from across the parking lot, but we're not a restaurant.' I was like, 'We catered in the mayor's office last week - that doesn't make his office a restaurant.' But they said, 'If you're feeding people there, there's no other classification for it.' So we jumped through a few more hoops to get it permitted as a restaurant - even though I never in

> a million years thought we'd ever be that."

Shallcross pauses for another sip of that excellent coffee.

"But then one of the first tastings we did in Swoop House was very unusual," he continues, "because we had a bride who'd picked out a menu that we all kind of liked, and we had this other bride who was like, 'The food's not that important to me, but I know I'm supposed to taste stuff, so will you

just give me a sample of whatever you want?' So I asked the first bride if she'd mind me inviting another bride and groom to come to the tasting? And she's like, 'I don't mind,' and so we had these two brides and two grooms who were coming over to eat the same thing. And the day that that was scheduled, we had someone else call us, who said, 'Look, I was just told today that we really should meet with you about the catering, but I'm leaving for California tomorrow morning, is there any way that we could come in in the next few hours?' And I said, 'Well, what are you doing for dinner tonight?' And I was like, 'Hey, Chef, can we do six tonight?" So we fed three brides and three grooms together at the same table - and the wedding photographer who'd recommended us, who was a good friend who lived nearby, we invited them, too - and it was hilarious. Because, normally, a tasting is me sitting at the head of the table and talking my head off and answering questions, but this tasting was a regular dinner party of strangers - and the grooms talked and the brides talked, and the photographer talked, everybody just chatting about weddings and things, and it was amazing. And at the end of the dinner, the chef looked at me and said, 'Every tasting should be just like this."

[Journo's note: I went to a couple of 2 Dine 4's Supper Friends dinners, back in the Before Times. And the food at those events, the thoughtful service within the elegant setting ... yeah, most dinner parties should be just like that.]

"And this commissary building," says Shallcross, referring to what was Metropolitan Bakery, "we've had so many tenants in there over the years, and we've got to see so many successful businesses begin and thrive. Tracy Claros with Sticky Toffee Pudding started here, and Cosmic Kombucha started here, and Zilks Hummus. Cake & Spoon is still here, and Arlo's Vegan Burger. And, most recently, Rebel Cheese was commissary-ing for their cheese here and they're doing really well now. I'm like, why didn't I start a vegan cheese company?

But, yeah, the Swoop House has been the impetus for most of this."

We won't even mention how Shallcross acquired that House's coral chandelier, or the antique bar from a 150-year-old pub in Ireland, or how ... listen: We won't mention any more about luck at all, except to note that, here's the longtime Austinite and his several businesses, right here with the rest of us: in the seemingly endless midst of bad luck known as 2020.

But he's surviving. Surviving enough, in fact - thanks to his own work and the help and connections of an Austin hospitality industry interwoven with so many go-getters he's been involved with over the years - that he's opened this new De Nada taco joint next to Sawyer & Co. on East Cesar Chavez, pivoting service to the outdoors and serving up the margaritas and a diversity of tacos so good that any of them could make you weep into your salsa verde. Oh, but no brisket tacos in particular - because the man knows what's up. "Yeah, no," he clarifies, "our tacos are great, but if I want a brisket taco, I'm going to Suerte. Because nobody makes a brisket taco better than Fermin Núñez."

So: humble? Or just accurate? In any case, Shallcross, bright eyes twinkling above that mask, always alert for the next opportunity - "I'm thinking about applying for a nursery permit," he says at Swoop House. "so we can sell some of the plants we've got here in the garden. Guests could come in for brunch, leave with a new plant!" - Shallcross is, as ever, downright lousy with the good fortune that often comes of community engagement and sustained effort.

Wrangling a Half Century With Asleep at the Wheel and *ACL*

New KLRU retrospective spotlights the shared history of two Austin icons by poug freeman

While it's common local knowledge that Willie Nelson taped the pilot for *Austin City Limits*, less recognized is that the actual first episode of the series when it debuted on PBS in 1976 paired an upstart young band reinventing traditional Western swing with their musical mentors who effectively created the genre. It was the first time that Asleep at the Wheel shared the stage with Bob Wills' Texas Playboys.

"The way it went down, they asked, 'Who do you want to be on the show with you?' and I said the Texas Playboys," recalled Ray Benson, formidable frontman for the Wheel. "Paul Bosner was the original producer, and he was from New York and didn't know who they were, and he said, 'That's great, let them do 15 minutes and y'all can do 40.' And we said, 'No no no, you don't understand, this is the Texas Playboys!"

That seminal first episode kicked off a relationship between *Austin City Limits* and Asleep at the Wheel that has maintained and evolved over the past half century, with the band gracing the ACL stage more than a dozen times in various forms (only Nelson has played the show more

often). ACL Presents: 50 Years of Asleep at the Wheel, which premieres on KLRU October 31, captures 20 of those performances from 1976 to their 2015 inaugural ACL Hall of Fame induction.

The hourlong special also presents an impressive document of the evolution of two Austin institutions over the years. showcasing how both Austin City Limits and Asleep at the Wheel have managed to remain relevant to the times while staying true to their roots. "Staying relevant means that we have to be willing to take chances, to book artists that might turn off some of our traditional audience, and believe me, we do get emails," said Terry Lacona, producer of the television series since its fourth season. "As long as I've been involved with the show, I've heard people say that we tune in to watch Austin City Limits whether we know who it is or not, because we know it's going to be good. They've got to be good to be on that stage. People trust what the show stands for."

"You look at [that] skyline background, the straightforward style of production, and there's not a lot of bells and whistles. there with Austin City Limits, in that we've never really wavered in our commitment to what we set out to do in 1974."

The special airs as both the show and the band weather the uncertainty of 2020's shutdowns. The series' 46th season was recorded without audiences, and their sister ACL Festival, for which the Wheel has played the opening set every year, went virtual with archived performances. The band likewise pushed its grand 50th anniversary celebrations to next October, though still plans to release the new album Half a Hundred Years this spring.

Those circumstances also provided a unique opportunity for Benson to approach the show about putting together a retrospective. For Benson, who edited it with his sons Sam and Aaron, it captures something unique about leading a band for so long. The talent that has spent time in Asleep at the Wheel literally requires its own Wikipedia page, not to mention their numerous collaborators and the artists they've backed over the years. "That's just who I am, I guess," he offered. "I never stop creating, and I've always been a collaborator. I've done solo stuff, but I always thrive on the band

interaction. The kind of musics, and I say musics in plural, but the kind of musics we play are challenging musics that you gotta be a pretty good player to master, but you have to also be able to play simple, simple stuff that is really not so simple. That's I think the trick of being in this band."

Collaborations with Lyle Lovett, the Avett Brothers, the Texas Playboys, and

Vince Gill provide some of the special's highlights, though none evoke the spirit of *ACL* and Asleep at the Wheel better than their 2009 episode of "Willie and the Wheel." "We figured out that we had

so many guests – Charlie Daniels, Delbert McClinton, Manhattan Transfer, on and on – that we couldn't fit them all on," attests Benson. "But my favorite for me was when we did 'Willie and the Wheel,' and I got to sing 'Pancho and Lefty' with Willie. I got to sing Merle's part. So that was it, as far as aspirations, that was way beyond anything I thought I'd ever get to do."

"I think the show that Willie did with them 10 years ago was almost as memorable for the pre-show on Willie's bus as it was for the show itself," laughed Lacona. "I'm glad we taped that show or else I might have forgotten that it ever happened. I'll just say if you ever spend any time with Willie and Ray together, you better watch out. Willie and Ray are a natural pair and have been friends for decades, and they are both just such a really big part of ACL's legacy. They represent a lot of what Austin City Limits stands for, and as much as things have changed and our music has changed and evolved, it still gets back to the authenticity and the originality that they represent and [that] have kept our show going all these years."

Body Horror

Belly of the Beast uncovers America's ugly and continuing history of forced hysterectomies SARAH MARLOFF

BELLY OF THE BEAST

D: Erika Cohn. (NR, 82 min.)

Erika Cohn's Belly of the Beast is not an easy documentary. Shot over the course of seven years, the film dives into the story of Kelli Dillon - a Black woman who was sterilized against her will in a California prison – and segues into issues of domestic violence, prison corruption, and eugenics. In light of recent reports regarding forced hysterectomies of immigrants at Irwin County Detention Center in Georgia, the questions and concerns raised by Belly of the Beast couldn't be more timely.

At 19, Kelli Dillon was sentenced to 15 years in Central California Women's Facility for shooting and killing her husband - the man who

verbally and physically abused her. While in prison, she was told she had an abnormal pap smear and needed a biopsy to check for cancer. Dillon told the prison doctor she wanted to have more kids but agreed to

a hysterectomy if cancer was detected. When she awoke from surgery, the doctor told her she was fine and would be able to have children. Over the course of the next nine months, she experienced panic attacks, weight loss, and night sweats. She did not get her period. As her lawyer Cynthia Chandler tells the camera, these are "classic symptoms of surgical menopause."

Dillon's medical records confirmed she never had cancer, but was given a hysterectomy. "I had been intentionally sterilized and I had

been lied to," she says looking directly into the camera.

Though Dillon was not the first woman to be forcibly sterilized in California's prison system, her case sets off a years-long legal and legislative battle led by activist-attorney Chandler and her organization Justice Now.

Visually, the first half of the film provides eye-catching contrasts - expansive green fields and semi-trucks, bright days and dark early mornings, inside versus outside. One image of the prison lingers: The walls and doors - presumably to dozens of cells - are bubblegum pink; the railing a saccharine-y color of cotton candy blue.

The result is perhaps the most horrific use of "pink think" to date, hinting at how the women inside the prison are treated. Like "caged animals" says Dillon, with no privacy from male officers' gaze.

Belly of the Beast becomes more procedural in its second half, focusing on Chandler, Oakland-based advocacy group Justice Now, and (with the help of Center for Investigative Reporting's Corey Johnson) California's shameful and expansive history of eugenics. To support the storytelling, Cohn uses footage from old newscasts, newspaper clippings, and audio from interviews conducted by Justice Now with incarcerated women who, like Dillon, were given hysterectomies against their wishes (most are

women of color, while white women were largely spared the prison's "cure all" for its inmates). That's a lot of ground to cover in 82 minutes and sometimes the storytelling feels jumbled. But Cohn attempts to offer viewers hope, largely through Dillon's story following her release: But the film, like the subject matter, remains bleak. For every win, there are losses. That's not to say it's not worth watching. It is. But it only prepares us for the fight still to come.

COME PLAY

D: Jacob Chase; with Azhy Robertson, Gillian Jacobs, John Gallagher Jr., Winslow Fegley, Jayden Marine, Gavin MacIver-Wright, (PG-13, 105 min.)

We've become accustomed to ghosts in the machine, but monsters lurking within our electronic crutches are a slightly newer concern. Ever since The Ring, creatures have become pretty adept at slinking in behind our screens, which is where we meet Larry. The twisted, slimy, sinewy, skeletal beast lives within your phone. and just wants a friend. He's decided that it will be Oliver (Robertson), a young boy with profound autism who communicates through an app on his phone. Already insulated from the world, Larry sees him as a perfect target to be his forever buddy, and is quite prepared to go through his estranged parents, Sarah (Jacobs) and Marty (Gallagher Jr.) to get him.

Horror is built on moms wanting to protect their kids, and Come Play falls down because Sarah just never really seems to connect with Oliver. Robertson really communicates the frustrating isolation of living with autism, and the film works best when it concentrates on him more, and Sarah less. Jacobs plays her more like a babysitter or nanny than a parent torn up by her dedication to her kid: not that she's solely to blame, because the script forces some bizarre decisions on Sarah, who jumps into believing Oliver's tall stories too fast and then makes a third act choice that feels unearned. Horror fans will recognize the nod to a modern Japanese classic, but Chase's script does too little of the groundwork for it to make the emotional logic required. In short, you won't buy it, especially since a tacked-on coda undercuts that very moment. Characters doing something dumb and then kinda, sorta getting away with it for a happy-ish ending is never how a film should end. Chase even has a big point to make about how our devices have left us more disconnected than ever but it's so obvious, and so unsubtly presented, that it slows the story to a crawl.

Yet while this amusement ride is in motion, it's pretty chilling and thrilling. The smart use of smart devices and filters add some ingenious scares, and Chase reimagines his original 2017 short "Larry" as one of the most effective sequences, with Oliver and his dad trapped in the toll booth where Marty spends his nights. Surrounded by darkness, they seem secure from Larry's interests and attacks, but with the ubiquity of screens he's

always got a point of entry. Even that scene pales by a deeply unnerving sleepover where Oliver's classmates make the mistake of looking into the shadows while Larry starts looking back.

Those scenes are so creepily executed that they almost lift Come Play above the library of mediocre supernatural monster chillers like The Bye Bye Man and Slender Man, films that come and go while barely disturbing your dreams. But this high-tech reinvention of Don't Be Afraid of the Dark, complete with its monster POV shots, doesn't have the heart to make yours really skip a beat.

THE DONUT KING

D: Alice Gu. (NR, 94 min., subtitled)

If you've had a fresh donut in Los Angeles, odds are really high that it came from a business owned and operated by Cambodian American businesspeople. That, as SXSW award winner The Donut King explains, is because of one man.

Cinematographer-turned-director Alice Gu's first feature, a boisterous yet thoughtful story, works from a fascinating premise. She starts by finding something so ubiquitous that we completely forget that there's a reason it happened. In the case of The Donut King, the reason is Ted Ngoy, a brash and often impulsive young Cambodian kid who joined the army and then fled to the U.S. to escape the incoming Khmer Rouge.

What he did when he got here was to see an opportunity that met his necessity. It's not just that he wanted a job, but that he wanted to build something for his family and for the Cambodian community that was stuck in Camp Pendleton, desperate for a chance at that new life they had been promised. Ngoy didn't simply want them to work for him (although the massive success of his Christy's Donuts empire shows he wasn't shy of making a buck) - he just wanted them to work.

He's quietly a series of contradictions. Ngoy the entrepreneur, Ngoy the family man, Ngoy the self-sacrificing community leader, Ngoy the refugee who wants to be looked up to and emulated, Ngoy the egomaniac. They're all parts of an inevitable rise-and-fall-and-somewhat-redemption story of a man whose legacy is bigger than he is.

The Donut King took the SXSW Special Jury Recognition for Achievement in Documentary Storytelling, and rightly so. Gu does stellar work compiling and constructing Ngoy's life story through interviews and archive and contemporary footage (much of it of delicious, delicious donuts you'll be drooling by the time she gets to the history of the Cronut). Yet it's animation sequences by Chapeau Studios and 1881 Animation that make the perfect drizzle of icing. These segments are used most during the toughest period - the transition from Cambodia during the genocide to Ngoy's first days working at a Winchell's Donut House in Newport Beach, Using them. Gu strikes the same balance as 2019 French Cambodian Oscar-nominated animated history

Funan – never detracting from the weight of what happened and without creating a massive divide between the first and second act. It's in the third act, with Ngoy's well-recorded lcarus-esque fall from grace, that the shift comes, and even then it's one of perspective, not tone.

After all, Gu's film is never just about Ngoy. Yes, it's about the way he helped build an opportunity for so many people, and how choices he made, like having pink boxes instead of white, became pivotal to the viability of fledgling stores. Yet Gu keeps her camera on how the community he helped build thrived and flourished without him, even as it acknowledged his role. As Asian Americans face increasing racism, its closing message about how immigrant communities - like the Cambodians who came over in 1975 with guns at their backs - help define America has only become more timely.

Grief has a profound effect on us. The loss and subsequent absence of a loved one leaves permanent scars on our psyche and often has unexpected and far-reaching repercussions, leaving questions forever unanswered, the path forward forever altered. Spanish director Rodrigo Sorogoyen's feature Madre contemplates these themes, as he expands on his Oscar-nominated short of the same name.

Indeed, that short acts as a prologue to the rest of the film and it is a heart-stopping 20 minutes of a parent's worst nightmare. Elena (Nieto) in her apartment with her mother, preparing for an afternoon of errands, receives a call from her 6-year-old son, Iván, who's on vacation with Elena's ex-husband, Ramon. Ramon has inexplicably left their child on a beach by himself. Elena frantically tries to calm Iván while trying to determine where he is. The police are no help, and the battery on the young boy's phone is dying. He tells her that a man has appeared on the otherwise deserted beach, coming his way. She tells him to hide. The man comes closer. We hear the man's muffled voice ask Iván a question. The phone disconnects.

The film cuts to a deserted beach, nothing but the sound of waves. It is a harrowing sequence.

Now, like an ellipsis, it is 10 years later. Elena is living in a tourist beach town in Southwest France, managing a seaside restaurant, and living in a small apartment by herself. Is this the same beach her son disappeared from? Is she still searching for him? Has she resigned herself to masochistically inhabit a space where her child was taken? No easy answers present themselves, as Sorogoven (with co-writer Isabel Peña) eschew a procedural narrative this premise might conventionally take. Instead, Elena leaving work one afternoon, spots Jean (Porier), a lanky, copper-haired teen on the beach. Struck by him, she follows him home. The following day, Jean shows up at her restaurant. The two develop a friendship, one that at first bemuses Jean's parents (the epitome of Parisian bourgeoisie on holiday), but soon becomes disturbing to them, as well as to Elena's patient boyfriend, Joseba (Brendemühl). The two spend more and more time together. lazy afternoons watching TV, getting drunk on the beach with Jean's friends. Elena's motive for this relationship is ambiguous at best, oscillating between maternal and borderline romantic. Jean, for his part, enjoys the attention of an attractive older woman, but there are glimpses that he understands a deeper dynamic is at play. As her relationship with Jean and a brief reunion with her ex-husband amplify her grief, she spirals into anger and bitterness. Madre is a film that for the most part relies on the viewer to interpret these complicated dynamics. And while it engages in this liminal balancing act, the film is a deeply compelling portrait of how intense loss shapes our behavior, our perspective, and most importantly, ourselves. - Josh Kupecki

SUMMONING HELL IN ATTACK OF THE DEMONS

Austin artist Eric Power casts a cardgore spell

Eric Power has opened the gates of Hades, but he didn't use eye of newt or toe of frog to conjure up a rampaging horde of hellspawn. Instead, the Austin animator has used the art of cutout animation – the midpoint between collage and stop-motion – to conjure his new creation, bloody supernatural cartoon *Attack of the Demons*.

Power had the outline for Attack of the Demons before he started his first feature. samurai epic Path of Blood (read "Austin Animator Eric Power Slices and Dices," Screens, April 20, 2018), "but I just felt like it would be too hard to make because I'd never tackled a project that big before," he explained. With its smaller cast and organic woodland settings, Path of Blood seemed like a more manageable first feature for an animator who works basically solo. However, even with his slice-and-dice animation skills honed by his first feature, he still turned to writer Andreas Petersen to flesh out his bare bones idea for Attack. "I wrote Path of Blood and, let me tell you, I ain't no writer and I don't want to do it again," said Power. "Meeting Andreas really let me know that it's possible to tell a good story."

He'd read one of Petersen's unproduced scripts and was struck by how close the tone was to what he wanted *Attack of the Demons* to be, "so I told him the loose concept of these three friends, and each one of them represents a different aspect of culture. One's a gamer, the film dude, and then the shoegaze music lover." There were a few other elements in place, like a showdown at a survivalist's cabin, that made the final

script, and a few others he jettisoned. "I had a pretty cool idea that they were going to escape in a hot air balloon and then they realize, oh shit, some of the demons can fly."

What remained truly constant is the underlying story, a bittersweet tale of realizing you can never really go back home – even before it was possessed by evil spirits that fused human and animal bodies together into unholy chimera. "That's Andreas' genius right there," said Power. "Making it about those characters as maybe somebody that you knew or somebody that you were. ... They're in a diner talking about the things they love, and that's my favorite part of this film."

Yet this isn't just a character piece but a bloody battle against evil forces. "I didn't think of the film as an animated horror," he said, although he did have to concentrate on adapting horror effects to his preferred medium. "There's just so much slime and blood that's far better done hand-drawn, so I had to do a lot of replacement animation where it's hand-drawn except I'm cutting it, which takes double the time." His biggest influences were the gruesome gooey gorefests of the late 1980s and 1990s, with the 1988 remake of The Blob sliming all over his approach to inducing panic with paper, "I just love that none of the characters were safe," he said. "All these people are just nice, and this horrible shit's happening. I think that's scary."

Attack of the Demons opens in Virtual Cinemas in Oct. 30, then arrives on VOD on Nov. 3. The soundtrack LP composed by John Dixon is also now available on "demon drool" pink and purple colored vinyl at www.shiptoshoremedia. com. Read our review at austinchronicle.com.

five locations across the nation. At some point. each of them explains the importance of casting your ballot, a civics lesson that appears to be effectively resonating this current election cycle.

First, there's the determined Bondy family, living off the grid in remote Alaska. Starting at dawn. they travel 222 miles by dog sled, snowmobile, and car to reach the closest polling station, barely making it there in time. (On the way, they stop on the side of the road to shoot a caribou buck that will "fill the freezer" for the year.) Then there's the ebullient James Higgins, proprietor of the Chicago tavern Club Lucky, one of the handful of bars in the country that double as a polling place on Election Day. (He treats the election volunteers and judges on the premises to cocktails after the polls close.) In Louisville, Ky., formerly incarcerated felon Michael Hiser casts his vote for the first time in his life after tirelessly working 11 years to bypass a state law prohibiting a person convicted of any felony from voting. In addition to his inspirational story (his post-poll tears will elicit some of your own), there's the indomitable Dr. Brenda Williams, an African American grandmother in rural South Carolina who selflessly spends the day assisting those who would otherwise be disenfranchised due to illiteracy, incarceration, or misenforced personal identification requirements. She's the undisputed unsung heroine of the movie, amazing in her energy, knowledge, and dedication to the cause. (She sings a mean gospel hymn, too.) And finally, there's Warren Buffett - yes, that Warren Buffett - who organizes and underwrites the nonpartisan Drive 2 Vote campaign, which provides Omaha, Neb., voters free transportation to the polling booth. He's the movie's best-known hero, a friendly go-getter at 86 who's game to have his photo taken with anyone boarding the trolley heading to the ballot box.

Director Woodhouse has no tricks up her sleeve here. There's nothing fancy about One Vote. In an era in which voting rights are blatantly under attack, she and her colleagues have chosen to simply focus on the will of Americans to find ways to overcome the obstacles that inhibit the ability to cast their ballots. While systemic measures are still necessary to protect the right to vote, the positive message communicated in this documentary echoes one from a previous Election Day not so long ago: "Yes we can."

SPELL

D: Mark Tonderai: with Omari Hardwick. Loretta Devine. Lorraine Burroughs, John Beasley, Andre Jacobs, Tumisho Masha, Ri-Karlo Handy, Steve Mululu, Kalifa Burton. (R, 91 min.)

There's a long tradition of hillbilly horror, and they've all been bound by one overwhelming, consistent fact: The murderous, often cannibalistic backwoods menaces are almost always white. Gloriously gonzo Appalachian creeper Spell makes one big change - having both the urban family in peril and the horrifying hicks with malicious intent be Black - and that's a refreshing change to a genre that's felt moribund since about Wrong Turn 2.

Marquis T. Woods (Power's Hardwick) dealt with some deep, dark trauma from his daddy when he was a kid in Kentucky, all shown and implied by flashbacks. Yet now he's a high-price lawyer with a little private plane, a picture-perfect family, and a swaggering attitude displayed in a clumsy early boardroom scene in which he justifies destroying Black litigants in court because their attorneys are white. Fortunately, those big city sequences disappear as Marquis and his irksome family plummet to the ground in a plane crash, and he wakes up with in the far-from-tender mercies of Miss Eloise (Devine), a sweet-natured old lady in a town in the middle of nowhere who happens to practice a backwoods form of hoodoo. She's crafted a Boogity, an Appalachian voodoo doll that she claims will help heal him. However, Marguis isn't quite so sure that she's all that set on a cure for him.

Spell slams straight into the mid-rankings of Black horror on its conceit alone. In blaxploitation flicks like Sugar Hill and Scream Blacula Scream, and later heirs like Bones, voodoo and Black magic are often a tool for righteous revenge, a connection to power and traditions taken away from Black people. Spell instead taps into the urban and middle class fear of inbred yokels and backwoods locals inherent in white horror films since before The Texas Chain Saw Massacre, just with an almost completely Black cast. When Marquis' son (Burton) calls these Appalachian crazies "country," it's a loaded term that his mother later regrets castigating him about.

This tale of rural mayhem is an unexpected turn for scriptwriter Kurt Wimmer, who has previously mixed bizarro genre (Equilibrium, Ultraviolet) with studio action (Salt, The Thomas Crown Affair revamp). Here, for the first time, he's gone full schlock - and just in time for his take on another rural horror standby, his Children of the Corn prequel. Fortunately Mark Tonderai, who has been on a tear for the last five years as a genre TV director on everything from Gotham to Doctor Who, dives right in there with him. Wimmer's scripts have an energetic lunacy that previously no one other than, well. Wimmer has ever quite captured, and Tonderai goes full penny dreadful.

This means the cast has to go big, too, and Hardwick throws himself into the part of the embattled and maimed Marquis with all the subtlety of a brick through a window with corn sack curtains. That's exactly what the story requires, as meek and mild would be no fun, and he has to go toe-to-toe with Devine, who rants, raves, coos, giggles, and storms across the screen with glee and reckless abandon. Understatement is not in Spell's nature, as shown by one great, ghoulish visual gag of Marquis removing a nail that deliberately swoops over the line from grisly to gross to wonderfully absurd. This is OTT cinema, and fun because of it.

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Music **Fat Tony Tales**

Fat Tony's new album teems with characters. From his current outpost in Tucson, where his partner studies law, avant-garde Texan rapper **Anthony Obi** details the exploratory Exotica. In fact, for its sole release show, the native of Houston's Third Ward travels to Austin to stage it in person on Nov. 6 at the Far Out Lounge. Locals Deezie Brown and Nayome join the outdoor, limitedcapacity event in what Obi calls his favorite city to play.

"It's funny," he begins. "The album is all about storytelling, and even the behind-thescenes making of the album is full of tales on its own."

Cosmic Timing With Producer Gldn Eye (Shaka Girvan)

"We first met December 2007, when Gldn Eye came to Houston to work with Mike **Dean.** who's a famous producer. **Pimp C** of UGK passed away that same month, and [Dean] had shut down his studio. So now, Gldn Eye is in Houston with not much to do, so we began hanging out.

"We haven't made a full-length together since my 2013 album Smart Ass Black Boy, so in many senses, Exotica is a long time coming for us as music partners. To make it full circle, not only did the unfortunate passing of Pimp C lead to me and Gldn Eve working together, now **Bun B** - the other half of UGK - is the only guest featured on the album."

Creating His Cast

"We wrote for a week and spent hours talking about who the characters would be - as if we're writing a movie or novel. Throughout the songs, we're looking at people finding ways to cope with life. I made a point not to put any moral judgment on these characters.

"That's completely up to the audience.

"Recording was really challenging, because we labored over the tone of my voice. Like on 'Feeling Groovy,' the guy is talking about leaving his wife for this other woman he desires. and I emulated that panic. On 'Gambling Man.' I tried to have a tone of a classic narrator, like the little rooster at the beginning of the old Disney cartoon Robin Hood, or an African griot.

"There's an artfulness about how these storytellers did their thing."

Recording "What Wake You Up" With Bun B

"We've kept a friendship over the years. Bun saw via social media that I was in Jamaica recording my new album, and DM'd me. Turns out, while we're in Kingston in Stony Hill, he's in Montego Bay celebrating his wife's birthday.

"Rather than let that be, I rented an Airbnb, and me and Gldn Eye packed up some studio equipment and drove across the country to meet up.

"Now Bun wasn't there for work, so he didn't have much time. Throughout the day, he's texting me like, 'I'm going to have a free moment - oh sorry, we're getting a massage.' After all these mishaps, finally, he had a window where he could come rock with us.

"I told him what I was looking for in the third verse, and he's typing away on his phone. After hearing the song twice, he got up, laid it down, and honestly, it was perfect the very first take."

Exotica's Texas Influence

"There's a **DJ Screw** movie called Soldiers United for Cash, and there's a scene of Lil' Flip freestyling outside of a car. He just sounded like he was in love with rapping, like he was a God MC, and that's the energy that I wanted to have on this album.

Owner Jim Daeng Ostrander announced the news last week, citing COVID-19 shutdown and construction along 183 South, which blocked the venue's main entrance. "The sign's coming down and the pictures are coming down," he said on Facebook, "Construction out here has been killing us for two years, and this pandemic is the final nail in the coffin."



"When we were writing, we would start the day off watching that - banging it loud.

"I remember posting it on my TumbIr a decade ago, and writing about how much that clip meant to me. Unbeknownst to me was the fact that later in my life it would be something I call back to. To always remember the spirit of who I am as a rapper."

Half of Live Music Fund Designated to BIPOC Musicians and Orgs

In an unprecedented move, the Austin Music Commission voted to designate half of the long-discussed Live Music Fund to BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and people of color) artists and organizations. The Live Music Fund, created last year, unlocked the first long-term fiscal support for the local music industry with a portion of hotel occupancy taxes. On Oct. 19, Commission Vice Chair Jonathan "Chaka" Mahone proposed plans for a BIPOC-focused fund, which passed unanimously and will eventually move to City Council discussion.

In a speech to the commission, Mahone contrasted the recent Council passage of \$5 million for COVID-19 emergency music venue funding under the SAVES resolution with the lack of civic funding for artists of color.

"The properties and buildings can't possibly be more important than the people. can they?" asked one half of local hip-hop duo Riders Against the Storm. "If the city understands that venues must be preserved, certainly they can take the next logical step to understand that the culture upon which these venues' profits were built must be preserved as well. If we found \$5 million for venues. what will we find for the historically neglected and disenfranchised communities of Austin?"

The move alters Mahone's June motion for a Black Live Music Fund utilizing half of the LMF, which gained over 3,800 signatures in an online petition. The new plan specifies goals of preservation, innovation, and elevation, abbreviated as PIE, across creative communities of color. Mahone cited recent appeals for city support from **Ana Maciel** of the Oswaldo A.B. Cantu/Pan American Recreation Center and Harold McMillan of Kenny Dorham's Backyard.

"When I hear leaders like [Maciel] speak about the legacy of Tejano music, or [McMillan] reminding us of the failed social contracts involved in building a cultural heritage district for Black culture, I think about funds for preservation," explained Mahone. "Preservation is necessary so that we never lose our cultural foundations."

He suggested the Music Commission's newly formed Systemic Racism Working **Group** tackle details of the new fund, which must align with state statutes regarding tourism. Commissioners also instructed city staff to look for other sources of BIPOC-focused artist funds beyond the Live Music Fund, given HOT funds have largely dried up alongside tourism during the pandemic.



here's a famous photograph by onetime Austin photographer Ken Hoge of Roky Erickson, Doug Sahm, and Jerry Jeff Walker onstage together locally at Gemini's in 1977. There may be no better encapsulation of Austin in the Seventies than that photo.

An ecstatic Erickson stands center on the mic caught in mid-scream as Sahm sweats through his pearl snap shirt on guitar while playing bandleader. The cowboy-hatted Walker, meanwhile, blows harmonica to the side. It's Austin's psychedelic birth howl, cosmic cowboy soul, and progressive country songwriting tumbling together on a single stage.

In the annals of Austin music history, Jerry Jeff Walker carved his own unique place. He catalyzed what would become the progressive country movement with his 1973 album *iViva Terlingua!*, setting off a new wave of Texas-inspired songwriting that revolutionized country music alongside the outlaw influences of Willie Nelson's *Shotgun Willie* and Waylon Jennings' *Honky-Tonk Heroes*, released that same year.

iViva Terlingua!, recorded live in Hondo Crouch's Hill Country hideaway of Luckenbach, became the hallmark of a distinctly Texan style: rowdy but laid back, where nothing mattered except the music and a good time (read "!Viva Belize!," Music,

Sept. 7, 2007). The lines of influence from that recording can't be understated. They span Gary P. Nunn's iconic *Austin City Limits* theme song "London Homesick Blues" to the Red Dirt country on the rebellious back of Ray Wylie Hubbard's "Up Against the Wall

Redneck Mother."

In addition to Nunn and Hubbard, the album introduced the world to Guy Clark's songwriting with Walker's

take on "Desperados Waiting for a Train."

"We didn't know what we were going to do," Walker recalled of the seminal recording session to the *Chronicle* in 1993. "We didn't even have the songs. I wrote 'Gettin' By' there that afternoon. Gary P. taught me

'London Homesick Blues' that afternoon. I said, 'Instead of me learning the words, you just sing it and I'll sing on the choruses.'"

Given Walker's championing other songwriters, it's fitting the troubadour's biggest success came from someone covering him.

His "Mr. Bojangles," written in 1968, became a Top 10 Billboard 1971 hit in the hands of the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band. By the time Walker settled in

Austin in the early Seventies, he had royalty money to burn and the party ensued.

Born Ronald Clyde Crosby in Oneonta, N.Y., in 1942, the singer didn't fully realize his sound until he landed in Texas. Walker perfected easy-going melodies that could hold revelations both simple and profound. That songwriting style served him well, allowing songs like "Sangria Wine," "Gettin' By," and "Pissin' in the Wind" to settle smoothly alongside the later-career earnestness of "Song for the Life" and "Because of You."

Walker's performances became rare following throat cancer in 2017, but at his annual Texas Bash at the Paramount Theatre for his birthday in 2018, the songwriter determinedly took the stage amid enthusiastic appreciation, kicking off the evening with a poignant rendition of "Laying My Life on the Line" (revisit "Jerry Jeff Walker in a New Key," Music, March 26, 2018).

"But here I am out here tonight, playing the songs that I like.

'Cause the magic is bringing each song you're singing.

Your whole life's laid out in lines. Well, I'm laying my life on the line."

Jerry Jeff Walker passed away in Austin Friday evening, Oct. 23, at the Dell Seton Medical Center. He was 78. He is survived by his wife Susan, daughter Jessie Jane, and musician son Django Walker.

Billy Joe Shaver Gets His Wings

Country songwriting sage (1939-2020) reunites with beloved son Eddy by KEVIN CURTIN

illy Joe Shaver left this world Wednesday, Oct. 28, at a hospital in Waco. According to local sources, the country music legend's health problems resulted from a stroke. The singer was 81.

The crème de la crème of Texas songwriters, Shaver wrote with the rare ability to contextualize life in a manner both artful and grounded. Songs penned by the Corsicana native included "I'm Just an Old Chunk of Coal (But I'm Gonna Be a Diamond Someday)," "I've Been to Georgia on a Fast Train," "Ride Me Down Easy," and "Live Forever," which he composed with his late son Eddy Shaver. Throughout his six-decade career, Billy Joe steadily produced a masterful body of song craft, so much so that he could hardly

remember the term other artists use when they can't write.

"I've never had that ... what do you call it? 'Writer's block' or whatever," he professed to the Chronicle in a 2014 interview (revisit "The Unabridged Billy Joe Shaver," Music, Aug. 5, 2014).

What makes a great song, is there a magic ingredient, I wondered?

"It's truth and saying it in as few words as you possibly can to the point where an idiot like me can understand it," he replied. "You've gotta start at the bottom. When I have trouble with a song, I'll lay it out on the table and visualize it as a letter to someone I care about. Then I'll realize what I want to say."

Asked if he wrote better on speed or God, he laughed:

"The speed just helped me stay up so I could have more fun, but I figure it knocked a whole bunch of years off my writing and my friendships. I don't think God helps anybody write songs, except maybe 'I'm

Just an Old Chunk of Coal.' I wrote that right when I was born again and it just came down through me."

Following a rough Texas upbringing, Shaver joined the Navy at 16 and returned home to start a family. Five years later, he lost two fingers on his right hand in a sawmill accident. In 1966, he relo-

cated to Nashville with a job as a songwriter in Bobby Bare's publishing company, for which he earned \$50 a week.

Shaver's star rose in Nashville when he penned or co-wrote all but one song for Waylon Jennings' 1973 classic Honky Tonk Heroes. In the ensuing years, Shaver's compositions were covered by Johnny Cash, Kris Kristofferson, John Anderson, and Elvis Presley, who closed his 1975 album Promised Land with Shaver's "You Asked

Me To." Additionally, Bob Dylan namechecked "listening to Billy Joe Shaver" in his song "I Feel a Change Comin' On." Shaver also distinguished himself as a solid actor, having a memorable turn in Robert Duvall's 1996 film The Apostle.

In much of his material - and life -Shaver seemed to have an angel on one shoulder and a devil on the other.

"I'm just a really spiritual, kinda hardheaded religious guy," he told Doug Freeman in a 2012 Chronicle feature. "I'm constantly wondering if I'm doing the right thing, every day and every second just about. And I realize now that people are listening to me, so now I'm very careful about what I write, because I don't want to hurt nobody.

"Actually, most of my songs, they were written trying to stay alive. The rest of them were written trying to get back in the house."

A faithful Christian no doubt, but Shaver also wrote a chapter or two on hell-raising. Legends about his toughness proved only partially true, he told the Chronicle:

"Half the stories are a blown-up bunch of bullshit. One time these two guys tried to roll me in the alley behind the old Ryman in Nashville and I whupped 'em and left 'em lying there. By the time I'd walked to the other end of town, people were already saying I'd beat up five guys, fucked 'em up so bad, kicked a hole in their damn car - all kinda crazy shit!

"The more I tried to deny it, the worse it got."

Shaver's most notorious incident made it into Freeman's cover story (revisit, "God Loves Ya When You Dance," Music, Aug.

"That shooting incident' is the infamous 2007 shooting outside of Papa Joe's

Texas Saloon in nearby Lorena, where Shaver shot Billy Bryant Coker in the face with a .22-caliber pistol. In the subsequent 2010 trial, the singer was acquitted of aggravated assault on grounds of self defense."

Shaver later wrote a song about it called "Wacko from Waco."

In death, Billy Joe is reunited with his son and lead guitarist Eddy, who passed away from a heroin overdose in 2000. In his song "Ride Me Down Easy," Shaver lands his lyric with maximum effect.

"Ride me down easy Lord, ride me on down. Leave word in the dust where I lay.

Say I'm easy come, easy go, and easy to love when I stay."

"Halloween's what I live for, so I'm very sad this year's going to be different," laments singer Felix Lenz of Lord Friday the 13th, who last Oct. 31 dressed as the Grim Reba, an amalgamation of Reba McEntire and the cloaked specter of Death.

"Usually, the day after Halloween we know what we're going to be next year, but this year we haven't landed on anything concrete," adds big sis Sloane Lenz, a fashion designer and guitarist. "One year, we were Mary-Kate and Ashley Olsen. Another time, I was Laura Palmer from Twin Peaks and Felix was Donna."

Phenomenal costuming and makeup factors heavily into the siblings' glammy, devilish art-punk group, which began freaking out local audiences last vear.

"I'm sorry, did I offend you? I certainly did intend to!" shouts Felix on potent new single "Bigots Beware." Over Sloane's slamming power chords, he continues: "Ignorance isn't bliss, when it's what you're up against!"

"We're from Athens, Texas, and it's a super conservative. Christian place." explains Felix. "I felt very 'other' there, but now Trump has made it a much


more sinister division. I feel actively in danger ... just for existing! With 'Bigots Beware,' I don't want to annihilate those people. I want to wake them up."

It's the first fang bite off an upcoming 2020 full-length the Lenzes recorded with Pete O'Hanlon and Evan Walsh of the Strypes, plus Becky Walsh, in Ireland. Its working title, Murder Music, refers to their self-ascribed novice status wherein they actually murder music. The sibs also await Guinness World Records to accredit their recent 24-hour Zoom, a variety show/telethon/sleep deprivation challenge.

"My eyes were so sore from looking at tiny faces on the screen for so long," admits Sloane.

"Everything started looking like an oil painting," concurs Felix.

AKINA ADDERLEY, "BROKE"

Akina Adderley wrote "Broke" before this summer's wave of social protest but the song finds its moment this election season. The anthem swaggers funk rhythm and scorching guitars as her powerhouse vocals demand, "There's a price you pay for freedom called responsibility," and calls to task a system of oppression: "Don't look away, you broke it, you bought it." The track delivers Adderley's first solo blast since 2013, stepping out from her jazz band Nori and numerous harmonizing roles. While uplift defines the tune's relentless momentum, it's a call that acknowledges the heavy work to be done in building equity. - Doug Freeman

ALI DITTO, "BETTER THAN ME"

Band photographer for hire and an axe wielder in current or erstwhile locals Mean Jolene, Missing Pages, and Talkies, Alison Copeland released a one-two punch of solo singles spurred by a year with little chance of band practice. The first, "The Stranger Song," debuted on June's third installment of the Slack Capital series, a Phil Spector-esque lo-fi pop haunt squaring itself up as one of the compilation's standouts. October closes with "Better Than Me," a bittersweet hymn recalling Karen Carpenter. "Everybody knows that this song is about you," she aches in a darkened Carly Simon refraction as strings ebb and flow through a three-minute - Greg Stitt run hopefully setting the stage for a full-length.

GIULIA MILLANTA: TOMORROW IS A BIRD

Unrushed acoustics stroll alongside Giula Millanta's airy timbre, "Today is a feather, tomorrow's a bird." Fitting lamentation to Tomorrow Is a Bird, the title song carves out delicate Americana burnished by the Austinite's voice taking flight. Following a similar thread to 2018's Conversations With a Ghost, the Italian native's seventh album weaves strummed ruminations and midnight melancholy into a satisfying, emotive whole heightened by a beautifully uncluttered arrangement highlighting Millanta's and David Pulkingham's tranquil guitars, Brian Standefer's ethereal cello, and Gabriel Rhodes' production. Earnest and baring, her songs glean a tactile intimacy that swell with heart. Her emotional awareness conveys these listless times on "Castle in the Clouds," and loving kindness yearns with a crying insistence in "Sugar Home," casting that same stirring spell for the stinging ache of "Kiss You Goodbye" and smoldering "Unconventional," - Aleiandra Ramirez the closer that burns bittersweet.

KALU & THE ELECTRIC JOINT, "MIRROR"

Kalu James reflects the whole of humanity on this revelatory new single, inverting police violence, racism, religion, and wall-building into an inner unrest that's palpable. "Our savior lives in the mirror/ Looks like me, feels like vou, lies like us," he sings over a heavy rhythm track that widens and redefines the musical structure he's built in Austin over the last decade. It's both the finest lyrical work from the Nigerian American, who just proudly voted in his first presidential election, and the unit's best moment. JT Holt's slippery multitracked guitar sounds like Egyptian LSD. - Kevin Curtin

AUSTYN ARMAND TWOFER

Tyrus Kendrick shares an undeniable synergy with fellow Austin crooner Ghostboy Jaysee (Jean Meama). The latter features on both singles released by Austyn Armand in October. "By My Lonely" finds the MCs turning a potentially throwaway track into a relaxed vibe about maintaining a go-getting mindset. Solid singing from Armand on the hook impresses especially. "Say My Name" contains a sing-rap style geared more toward Jaysee's discography, but also suited for Armand as evidenced by this lane switch Producers Frosty and Dee3x lace a heat bristling sharp acoustic riffs and incisive drums, while both rappers beg women not to tarnish their names. Austyn Armand sure sounds motivated.

J SOULJA: THIS AIN'T SHXT Apple Music, Spotify, Tidal, YouTube

Jalen Howard ushered in his 28th birthday with a celebratory bash for This Ain't Shxt. The East Austin rapper's sixth studio release follows May long-player From the Soul, its five tracks concocting Soulja's usual "512 wrist work shit." A heavy dose of bars feature on the 15-minute regular edition, while the deluxe version - currently an exclusive given out to release party attendees - adds four more joints highlighted by a Teeta guest appearance. Creator of the Smoke Out ATX hip-hop series gives gratitude for God helping him find his way and the inability of snakes to rattle his drive. - Derek Udensi

SHINYRIBS / JEFF BROWN

"Golden Age of Outrage" / "Terry. What Are You Thinking Of?" YouTube

Kevin Russell locates the groove in anything, including our current social (dis)order. Shinyribs' latest offering reports from his darkly lit bunker ahead of Election Day, cycling through all-too-familiar internet footage of mask meltdowns, squad cars burning, and power fist rallies. Never shy on speaking up, the group leader aims his wit in meta-commentary on "outrage as the new religion," with the Tijuana Trainwreck Horns providing a backbone of punching riffs to the Shiny Soul Sisters' (Kelley Mickwee and Alice Spencer) kickboxing backup vocals. The Ribs rhythm section, bassist leff Brown and drummer Keith Langford, unspools their own quarantine project, teasing an album with a string of singles and latest video "Terry, What Are Thinking Of?" The easy croon and strum hearken Brown's band the Savage Poor with a touch of Paul Westerberg as the local trio dance around their basement bar. - Doug Freeman

CHOCTAW WILDFIRE, "DINGLEBERRY PIE"

Choctaw Wildfire desecrates the white man's pantry, bathroom, and presidency! A New Orleans brass promenade. "Dingleberry Pie" teases the locals' first album since 2015 mad dogs and Englishmen roundhouse Nowhere by blowing through 80 pie types in 3:35. Landing on the flavor of the times, ringmaster Charlie Pierce clears a throat full of Leon Russell, Dr. John, Tom Waits. Synced to the election, Nashville's Shaye Smith whammies up a scatalogically profane video decrying Hamp (what my 6-year-old calls our current president). "I wrote the tune years ago when I lived in Michigan and taught in Benton Harbor as the school district was crumbling," emails Pierce. "It was a miserable situation and writing about that reality as being a piece of dingleberry pie helped me laugh about it. I never intended the song to be about IMPOTUS, but felt it an appropriate description of his presidency" Catch the tribe live in person on Election Night at Guero's, 7-8pm, then performing a midnight set at Sagebrush. - Raoul Hernandez

SIDESHOW TRAGEDY: AFTER THE FALL

Something happened on the way to recording this Austin garageblues duo's fifth full-length, After the Fall: Song-n-sound generator and National Reso-Phonic guitarist Nathan Singleton's 16-year marriage crumbled. So he, articulate caveman drummer Jeremy Harrell, and producer Kenny Siegal - who worked with inspiration Chris Whitley - decided this record required new colors: bass, keyboards, horns, choirs, even Tom Waits' avant-blues guitarist Marc Ribot ("Hold On It"). Singleton unleashes his inner Lou Reed on a clutch of glam Stones rockers, each one seemingly redolent of a crumbling personal life: "My teeth are loose in my head, my gums are bleeding, and my breath smells like death." he intones mordantly in "The Lonely One." "Won't take no medicine no doctor prescribes, but that's okay, 'cuz you know I ain't ever gonna die." Sideshow Tragedy livestreams a release party Friday via Bud's Recording Services.

TELE NOVELLA, "TECHNICOLOR TOWN" YouTube

Tele Novella explores the charm of Lockhart even in lockdown with a first taste of new album Merlynn Belle, expected in February on influential indie Kill Rock Stars. Whereas 2016 debut House of Souls swooned a psych-pop vibe, "Technicolor Town" lilts with a lo-fi grace and sense of magic. In the video, directed by Vanessa Pla, Natalie Ribbons and Jason Chronis offer a love story within and to their home, skipping through the quiet town square and emptied theatre in an anachronistic pantomime and silent movie, a wilting moment of beauty and wonder. 
NOSFERATU

Debuting October 1988 at the original Alamo Drafthouse on Colorado with a live original score by Brown Whörnet, Nosferatu bonded the pioneering dinner-n-drinks franchise to Austin's music capitalists. Now streaming on demand, the 1922 silent film still seduces all moviedom in a dazzling pre- and post-World War I German avant-garde glow. Furthering an aesthetic set locally by the likes of the Butthole Surfers and Ed Hall, a Brown Whörnet nonet composed and combined saxophone, trumpet, two trombones, clarinet, flute, and enough piano, guitar, bass, and drums for a Frank Zappa show into a 94-minute soundtrack masterstroke. Rockist. absurdist, industrial, the group's heavy metal heft, progressive post-punk conviction, and the avant-garde freak factor launched a series of local groups syncing interpretations of wordless classics live at the Alamo, a series returning virtually next month with five new installments. Whörnet trio Peter Stopschinski, Jimmy Burdine, and Tyler Harwood perform live - Raoul Hernandez online Sunday, 7:30pm.


