Surviving Whole in a Broken System

During October's Domestic Violence Awareness Month, we heard about the behind-closed-doors issue of family violence. But as hidden as domestic violence is, we experience a type of domestic abuse even more in the shadows: the abuse of people with disabilities by their caregivers.

In Texas, there are approximately 275,000 people receiving home- or community-based care, and about 300,000 personal care attendants RENEE LOPEZ (PCAs). Those numbers may AND NANCY look fine, but when you consider that a person receiving care CROWTHER often needs two or three shifts of assistance, you can see how uneven the ratio actually is. On top of that, the starting wage for a PCA is only \$8.11, and the average wage is about \$9 an hour.

There aren't enough PCAs and the pay is too low to attract more people to the field or to keep good caregivers. On top of all that, the nature of the work puts underpaid PCAs in a position of power over the people they're caring for - and that

power is often exploited. We are both strong,

smart, empowered women living with disabilities that require us to employ PCAs. We rely on these PCAs for much of our basic needs, including getting us out of bed, eating, bathing, and more. Thanks to attendant services, people with disabilities can live in the

community instead of being warehoused in institutional settings. Attendants can help people with disabilities attend school, go shopping, go to work, go out to eat. We become a part of our community instead of apart from it.

However, this reliance on PCAs opens us up to greater potential for abuse. Many people with disabilities trade safe and respectful relationships for the freedom to live in the community. And it's incredibly easy for the power dynamic to shift. PCAs hold great power to support or to abuse people with the disabilities.

When I (Renee) moved into an apartment with my boyfriend, we had a lovely attendant, but things kept disappearing. Recognizing our dependence on this attendant that we both liked, my boyfriend insisted that I was the one losing or forgetting things – a lie the PCA was happy to play along with. One day I found the attendant stealing my new bath towels. My boyfriend still insisted that we continue

to employ her. (I soon moved out and away from the gaslighting PCA and unsupportive boyfriend!)

Often because the care is personal (bathing, dressing, transferring in and out of bed or chairs, toileting, etc.), the person using attendant care is treated or viewed as a child - patronized or expected to

be happy with whatever they receive.

I (Nancy) have had more than 30 attendants come and go since I first enlisted the assistance of an attendant at the tender age of 19. It is still hard for me to fathom that theft, verbal abuse, mental abuse, exploitation, deception, and phys-

ical abuse can happen, but it did happen to me. It became a part of life. I have had a lifetime of attendant experiences mostly good - but when they are bad, they can break a human's spirit.

The pool of available PCAs continues to shrink thus increasing risks for abuse and exploitation. People with disabilities

who rely on this service for basic care needs are not eager to speak out or complain or report abuse. The guid pro guo is putting up with abuse and exploitation to stay in the community and live as independently as possible.

Emotional abuse. Financial abuse. Physical violence. We talk about these in romantic or family relationships, but it is time to bring to light the impact that caregiver abuse has on the nearly 275,000 people in Texas needing their assistance. It is time to support people with disabilities and PCAs by paying caregivers more, and giving them - and the people they serve the respect they deserve.

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
to boast a sandy bottom & actual springs still active. Today, the creek is the color of India ink.

BETO ENTERS THE RING Beto O'Rourke announced on Monday his bid to challenge incumbent Goy. Greg Abbott in the 2022 Texas gubernatorial race. The former congressman came close to unseating Ted Cruz in a 2018 Senate race, and didn't come close at all in his brief campaign for the 2020 presidency. O'Rourke swiftly broke Democratic fundraising records, yielding \$2 million in donations in the first 24 hours of his candidacy for governor. Abbott currently boasts nearly \$60 million in his campaign coffers.

WHO ELSE IS RUNNING? Community organizer Zohaib "Zo" Qadri will run for Council's District 9. the seat held by 10-year Council veteran Kathle Toyo. If elected. Qadri would be the first Muslim elected to Council.

WHO'S RETIRING? ... Travis County clerk and voting rights champion Dana DeBeauvoir announced she will not seek reelection for the post she's held since 1986.

WHO'S DEFECTING? ... After redistricting turned his House District 31 into red country. Democratic Rep. Ryan Guillen said he's a Republican now.

LDC LAWSUIT UPDATE A hearing in the lawsuit filed against the city of Austin by homeowners over Council's effort to rewrite the Land Development Code unfolded as the Chronicle went to press on Nov. 17. After losing the initial suit in March 2020, city attorneys filed an appeal in the 14th Court of Appeals in Houston. The appeals court won't issue a ruling for months, but if successful. Council could take the final of 3 votes needed to pass the revised LDC, if it so chooses. More in next week's issue.

WORKERS DEFENSE PROJECT reported Wednesday that it had filed a complaint with the Office of Police Oversight following a police raid on WDP's Austin offices. The nonprofit accused the Austin Police Dept. of "an intimidating show of force" when armed officers allegedly broke down the door and seized the "entire security footage recording apparatus, including weeks of confidential video recordings instead of simply emailing a subpoena for the relevant two hours and five minutes of footage." APD sought footage of an alleged attempted assault that occurred in WDP's parking lot in October 2021.

AU REVOIR, JANNETTE City clerk and 2020 Texas Municipal Clerk of the Year Jannette Goodall is headed to Ft. Worth to serve as city secretary. Council votes on Myrna Rios as interim clerk in today's meeting.

refused to turn over documents related to a defamation lawsuit brought against him, a Connecticut judge ruled the InfoWars host/conspiracy theorist liable by default. Jones has now lost all defamation suits brought against him by the families of Sandy Hook victims.



The Front Lines of Democracy

As voting's become a battlefield, Dana DeBeauvoir has stood up for all of our rights

I've never covered an election in Travis County that Dana DeBeauvoir hasn't run; the county clerk, herself among the longestserving local elected officials in Texas, would have appeared on the Demo-

cratic primary ballot for the 10th time next March. But she's not going to. "The final straw was **AT LARGE** when I got shingles on the right side of my face on Election Day," she told me with a laugh earlier this week. She laughs about many things, including the way she's worn her hair for much of her career. "Fortunately, my hair covers that side of my face. But it hurt."

It's hardly the first, or the worst, misfortune to befall a woman who, until Harris

County's turn in the voting rights spotlight in 2020, bore the brunt of decades of criticism of how Texas conducted elections. But it was a sign. "I realized the filing period was less than two weeks away" from

this past E-Day, DeBeauvoir said, "and I had intended to run down on [this past] Saturday and file, but the whole thing seemed so ... daunting. So I thought it was a very good time" to announce her retirement from the office she's held since 1986. She's committed to stay on to run the special

election in late January to fill the unexpired term of Council Member Greg Casar, now running for Congress. On January 28, she'll turn 68 and be unemployed. Then it's

up to us to carry on. "I have to get over the guilt of being the general leaving the battlefield," she said, "and getting somebody competent to take over, and not knowing what's in store for me in the future. It's scary, so I held on until the very last minute. ... I'm still going through this process myself; it's a job I've loved so much, and I'm grateful to the people of Travis County for hiring me through the ballot. It's been a great ride."

1990 - I was a stringer for the defunct Dallas Times-Herald, working alongside the late Molly Ivins and Ross Ramsey, who would go on to co-found The Texas Tribune nearly two decades later. Back then, our business was still only vaguely computerized, as were our elections; we voted by marking paper ballots with graphite pencils like taking a test, which were dropped into physical boxes that needed to be gathered up when the polls closed and deposited, generally, in the basement of the old municipal auditorium, where hordes of election workers and venerable old hunks of machinery tallied and double- and triple-checked the results well into the wee hours.

The lengthy ballot tabulation process prompted polite but persistent grumbling from campaigns and office holders, to which DeBeauvoir responded with equally persistent advocacy for more resources and improved technologies. After the uncertainties of the 2000 election played out right in the streets of Travis County, the federal Help America Vote Act in 2002 made DeBeauvoir's cause into the nation's; she would soon deploy the county's first electronic voting machines, the eSlate model produced by Austin-based Hart InterCivic, part of a corporate family that had printed Texas ballots for nearly a century.

DeBeauvoir was not herself a particularly tech-savvy type, and she also oversaw the keeping of other Travis County records, from marriage licenses to steer brands, in a semi-automated fashion. She understood that, all other things being equal, electronic voting would be more efficient and accurate than prior practice and was a zealous evangelist for its adoption. However, as you may recall, it wasn't long before questions about the integrity of "black box voting" began to emerge, primarily on the left, where activists all but convinced themselves that President George W. Bush would, or did, get himself reelected by exploiting the flaws in voting machines. After a while, DeBeauvoir came to believe the academics working on election security had a point and that none of the companies in the sector had the security and auditability requirements (including a voter-verifiable paper trail) that the task demanded.

That led to a years-long collaboration with many of her most pointed critics to produce the STAR Vote platform (Secure, Transparent, Auditable, Reliable). It proved to be the one that got away; the companies refused to build it, the public funds weren't forthcoming, and for now it remains a hypothetical best-case solution. But the effort was not fruitless. "It's a highly technical job now, with testing and auditing, and I hope STAR Vote pushed us down the road."

Her last years in office have also included widowhood and the death of DeBeauvoir's mother, placing into perspective her own childhood as a survivor of abuse. From an early age, she's stood up to bullies, now including the MAGAmuffins and conspiracists who've taken the black-box baton and run for the rightmost lane of the track. "People have asked: Was it the ugly people at the polling places? The dumb attorney general? Were they part of my decision to leave?" She pauses to let her laughter die away; she's 100% serious now. "Absolutely not." She feels the office is prepared but will still need a leader with "competence and very good judgment and a lot of smarts and communication skills. I hope we will elect someone with all of that." She believes strongly that elections should be run by an independent officeholder and not an administrator who can "be threatened and fired at the drop of a hat," and that the clerk should also take over voter registration from the assessor's office where people used to pay their poll taxes. "There is dysfunction in that system, and of course a history of racism. I'd like to see that broken by the next county clerk." \blacksquare

Home for the Holidays

The Chronicle office: We're (almost) back!


As I sit down to write this column, Music Editor **Kevin Curtin** has just buttonholed Art Director **Zeke Barbaro** in the hallway outside my office.

"Hey, here's what I'm thinking of for next week's cover. I don't know if I have the right number of stick figures in there, but the main ones could go here, and it'd say ..." And a two-minute conversation ensues, at the end of which, Zeke swears he knows what it'll look like, and says he'll get the photos assigned.

And *that*'s why we're prepping for a return to work in the office in a couple of weeks, after working almost exclusively from home for the past 20 months. (We were one of the earlier businesses to shut down back in March 2020, after a staffer became one of the first three people hospitalized in the Travis County area.)

It won't be easy: we had a two-hour meeting yesterday to go over the details. The policy is going to be that everyone entering the building must be vaccinated, and for now must wear a mask in any common area; but of course, nothing's as simple as it seems. What about negative COVID tests, or high antibody counts? Religious or medical exceptions? Masks in shared offices? Shared lunches on production days, which has been a Chronicle tradition for 40 years? Everyone's level of comfort - and of risk - is different, and on some things, we're just going to have to feel out how things develop, while following changing health guidelines along the way.

And it won't be the same as it was before. While we've missed a lot of the synergies of working as a team, discussing things in per-



BARBARO son, and getting to look at layouts in their actual printed form, people have found a lot of value in working remotely as well. So most will continue working from home for two days a week - that seems like the best balance of "getting more work done when I'm not at the office" and "not being able to find people when I need to talk to them" - and the office will likely be open to the public only Tuesday to Thursday. Meetings will be a mix of in-person and virtual (but hopefully not hybrids of both at once). And we'll continue to use a lot of the webbased processes we've developed over the last year and a half, and we'll see.

> I bring it up because it may shed some light on how these decisions are made, and it may sound familiar; this is a dance a lot of people and places are going through, as we seem to be groping our way toward whatever the new normal is. See you there.



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Unmarshaled?

Council, advocates balk at new Muni Court force

Over the past

five years,

City Council members and criminal justice advocates were caught off guard this week by Item 35 on the Council agenda today, Nov. 18, that would create a new law enforcement agency in Austin specifically tasked with providing security at **Municipal Court**.

The court has operated virtually since March 2020, but partially opened for in-person services in July of this year at its new home on Burleson Road in Southeast Austin. Security there has been provided by seven **Austin Police Department** officers and by private security paid through the court's bud-

get. If approved, Item 35 would create a stand-alone **City Marshal Office**, a \$2.8 million state-certified law enforcement agency managed by the court. From 1987 to 2006, the city had a Marshal division which reported to the Law Department; it provided security at the airport and Municipal Court, but was consolidated under APD in 2008.

After a frenzy of calls made by justice advocates prompted thorough and

skeptical questioning at Council's work session Tuesday, the item will be postponed; it's not clear just when it will be back. Those advocates – especially ones who served on the City-Community **Reimagining Public Safety Task Force** – knew nothing of plans for the City Marshal, even though staff indicated to Council that the office would further the goals of the RPS effort.

"As part of the Reimagining Public Safety initiative," the agenda backup for Item 35 reads, "establishing a City Marshal program will allow APD to reassign its officers to functions that require sworn peace officers working in the community." That language rubbed advocates the wrong way, as the city departments involved gathered input internally but not from the community. "I find it incredibly concerning the way this proposal was brought to Council," Texas Fair Defense Project Deputy Director **Jessica Johnson** told the *Chronicle*, saying the staff move "speaks volumes to whether the city is truly committed to reimagining public safety, or [is] just putting a pretty label on power structures continuing to function without community participation."

> Austin Justice Coalition Policy Director Chris Harris said the proposal is swapping "cops for cops" – while the APD officers would return to patrol, the City Marshal chief and deputies would have the same authority to arrest people and use force as the officers being replaced, even if their duties are ostensibly more limited. Council likewise questioned what value was being added; in the 18 months staff estimates it will

take to staff up the new office, Austin's **police academy** will have graduated as many as 250 new cadets. Why couldn't some of them be assigned to Municipal Court? Would the training of the deputy marshals also happen at the academy? (Assistant City Manager Rey Arellano, who oversees the city's public safety departments, said no, but where the training will take place is not yet determined.) Would the Marshal Office be accountable to the Office of Police Oversight?

Even the Municipal Court itself is ambivalent. Presiding Judge **Sherry Statman** told Council, "This is not what we wanted. We do <image>

not want to be in the law enforcement business. We are a court ... this is something quite new to us." However, Municipal Court Clerk **Mary Jane Grubb** explained, the Marshal proposal is the best alternative to continued APD security, their preferred option. While Grubb said she understands the concerns and wants to work with advocates, "there are certain things we can't do until we have Council approval," such as apply for certification through the **Texas Commission on Law Enforcement**, begin recruiting a chief marshal, and order uniforms and vehicles – all tasks that contribute to the 18-month lead time.

Ensuring a safe courthouse experience for everyone who enters – staff, attorneys, and defendants alike – has been a concern. Grubb reports that over the past five years, the Municipal Court has seen a 75% reduction in cases but a 275% increase in "security incidents," such as threats, escape attempts, and introduction of weapons. The **Downtown Austin Community Court** sees similar defendants, but they have social workers trained in de-escalation techniques on staff to help when tensions escalate; Municipal Court depends on their security to perform that work. Grubb hopes that engaging with community stakeholders can help develop "guardrails" around what the courthouse security force can and cannot do that will help create a safe environment for all. "The purpose of the program is to provide court security for everyone who enters the building," Grubb said. "We plan on engaging the community and getting stakeholder input to create a model Marshal Office."

The Municipal Court hears low-level misdemeanor cases, such as traffic and ordinance violations like public camping. Most of the defendants appearing before the court are indigent; many of TFDP's clients have cases there, and Johnson said, "We need to make court staff and the people accessing the court feel safe when interfacing with it." That means developing policies and procedures that account for the perceptions and needs of both groups, in particular by not assuming every defendant walking into the court is a potential threat. "It takes time to do this work," Johnson told us. "But a process with meaningful community engagement will produce more just and equitable outcomes than if we continue to depend on policing solutions to problems."

Report Critiques COVID-19 Response in Local Jails

"Everyone is getting sick around me. No one is getting treated for symptoms. They charge for cold busters and aspirins. I ask officers for a COVID-19 test and they brush me off."

This quote from a person held in the Williamson County Jail in Georgetown during the height of the facility's **coronavirus outbreak** illustrates some of the findings of a new study titled **"Infected With Fear: The Coronavirus in Central Texas Jalls."** The report critiques the responses of jail administrators in Travis, Williamson, Bastrop, Caldwell, and Hays counties, finding that they struggled to keep their facilities clean and to provide masks, testing, and medical care during a pair of outbreaks between April 2020 and June 2021. The report was released by the criminal justice reform organizations **Texas Appleseed** and the **Texas Justice Initiative**. TJI mailed and hand-delivered bilingual surveys to incarcerated individuals and circulated an online survey to jail staff, receiving 1,231 responses. The group also tracked the evolving policies of the five jails.

The results revealed what the authors describe as "a messy patchwork of inconsistent policies, ambiguity, and confusion as jails attempted to maintain operations amid a new and unknown pandemic." The biggest complaint from those incarcerated was that they were provided only one disposable mask, which was not regularly replaced. Inmates in Williamson County reported that they waited 30 to 50 days for new masks. Travis and Hays counties, however, had policies allowing masks to be replaced daily or twice a week.

Most inmates reported that they were not given a COVID-19 test if they asked for one. In Travis, Hays, and Williamson counties, between two-thirds and three-fourths of inmates who felt sick said they were not provided medical care. Travis County waived medical fees for COVID-19 treatment but other counties charged individuals for basic medicines like Tylenol and cough suppressants. The report criticizes the quarantine practices of all five counties. "Some jails made no effort to quarantine infected people whatsoever," the authors write.

The findings come as no surprise to Austin defense attorneys such as **Carl Guthrie**, who described the Travis County Correctional Complex in Del Valle during its January 2021 outbreak as "a ghost town – except

ENVIRO GROUPS OPPOSE PLANS FOR VIOLET CROWN VENUE

Several prominent Central Texas environmental organizations have announced their unified opposition to plans for the ambitious Violet Crown Amphitheater, a proposed 20.000-seat venue billed as Austin's answer to Colorado's historic Red Rocks Amphitheatre. The development, which is surrounded by the Nature Conservancy's Barton Creek Habitat Preserve and the creek itself, has plans for luxury apartments, a driving range, a distillery, and a nightclub, but Mark Clifford of the Greater Edwards Aquifer Alliance says it's the amphitheatre itself – planned to have one of the largest bandshells in the U.S. - that's the main issue: "If they just wanted to do a regular development, it would be challenging to have an eco-friendly site ... but it could be done. But a 20,000-seat amphitheatre is such a problem-maker from so many different standpoints."

The problems foreseen by GEAA, TNC, and allies Save Our Springs Alliance, the Lone Star Chapter of the Sierra Club, and Save Barton Creek Association include noise pollution, increased traffic on Texas 71 and Southwest Parkway, damaging runoff into Barton Creek, and harm to the endangered golden-cheeked warbler and the vulnerable **black-capped vireo**, the two songbirds whose habitat is protected in the preserve. "Some of the best golden-cheeked warbler habitat in Travis County would be severely compromised with the traffic, light and noise that a development of this scale would create," states the Nature Conservancy's website. Clifford explains that amplified music could force songbirds to flee to a different part of the preserve, which would increase competition and lead to lower survival rates: "The whole purpose of the preserve is to give them a habitat, it's not to make them run to the other side of the preserve to escape this man-made monstrosity."

Another concern is the effect of construction runoff. Clifford points to the increasing prevalence of toxic algae in Austin waterways, which thrive on nutrients flowing into the creeks from developments upstream: "The fact that [algae] showed up in Sculpture Falls [on Barton Creek] tells us that we're overdeveloping." The problematic nutrients, he continues, "come from septic tanks, sewage, agricultural runoff, fertilizers, pets. As soon as you start sticking people into the wilderness, you have nutrient problems."

In response to these concerns, Craig Bryan, president of International Development Management, says, "Everything that I am doing on this project, I want to do at a higher level than what's expected." This includes eight water retention sites that the city of Austin can inspect annually, sediment filters, and restrictive covenants to prevent the use of pesticides or herbicides. Jim Wittliff of Land Answers, the project's code consultant, points out that some of the site was originally platted back in 1981 and could be grandfathered under less restrictive codes. "We voluntarily are restricting the entire site to current code, which is 20% impervious cover." as specified in the 1992 Save Our Springs **Ordinance**. Though not required by the state to study the project's traffic impact on Texas 71, the developers are conducting an analysis as requested by the Travis County Commissioners Court.

"We are gladly providing the things that are being asked of us," Bryan continues. "We want to ensure everyone understands we have thought about these problems, and we're addressing them before they come up." He also emphasizes the creation of an endowment "that focuses on preserving nature we don't even touch."

Clifford isn't convinced the mitigation tactics will be enough to protect Barton Creek. "We have very stringent requirements for building in the Barton Creek watershed ... and even with all that, we're having these toxic algae issues. At the end of the day, the water doesn't lie, and is the indicator of whether we are doing our job as environmental stewards. The water is telling us that we're failing." The city expects the project to be considered by Council next year. – *Lina Fisher*

for the damned ... There was no social distancing. And it's not like they had PPE, it's not like there was real medical care, as much as I'm sure the medical people at jails want to help. It's just what it is – we as a society have decided these people deserve less." During the height of the outbreak, the kitchen and laundry facilities at the correctional complex were shut down. For days, inmates were fed nothing but peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Fear of infection was rampant. Still, none of those in Travis County's jail who caught the virus died from it. Guthrie gives credit to local authorities who limited arrests for nonviolent offenses at the outset of the pandemic, thus reducing the total jail population.

Only three COVID fatalities have been reported in area jails – two in WilCo and one in Caldwell County – according to Eva Ruth Moravec, one of the study's authors. She said the biggest improvement jail administrators could make in future outbreaks would be mandating the use of masks. "I'm hoping that something as simple as that would just be more accessible to people going forward," she said. "Regardless of what the type of outbreak is, we know that things can be contained better with masks." – Brant Bingamon

D.A. unveils multipart strategy to curb gun violence

The **Travis County District Attorney's Office** has unveiled a four-part strategy with other agencies and community partners to address **gun violence** that has risen throughout the county in the last two years.

Some core elements of the plan involve the official powers of the district attorney, such as **Prosecutor-Led Gun Diversion Programs** for those arrested on firearms

charges. Researchers at the **University of Chicago** have evaluated PLGDPs in various cities that identify people arrested on gun charges who may be at high risk of reoffending and intervene with therapy, anger management, and other services to address root causes of violence.

The plan also includes a partnership with **Arizona State University** and **Johns Hopkins University** to update research on the role firearms play in **intimate partner violence** and enable law enforcement to intervene; a countywide **firearm surrender protocol** and public awareness campaign on **safe gun stor-**

age; and a **victim services** unit within the D.A.'s Office, staffed with counselors trained in **trauma-informed care** to better assist victims as their cases work their way through the criminal justice system.

But the plan's creators acknowledge that even a progressive district attorney such as Travis County's **José Garza** mostly has power to act *after* gun violence has taken place, either with pretrial diversion or by seeking appropriate sentences for repeat offenders. Reducing rising gun violence *before* shots are fired requires working with a community's public health and social service agencies, as well as law enforcement. At a press conference announcing the initiative, Garza sought to strike a balance. "If you pick up a gun, pull the trigger

and take someone's life in this community, you will be arrested and you will be held accountable," Garza told reporters. "But if we are serious about ending violence in our community, we have to do more than punish people after they have caused harm. We have to do all we can to prevent violence before it happens."

To help identify those preventive measures, the D.A.'s Office has contracted with Dr. **Chico Tillmon**, a senior research fellow at the University of Chicago Crime and Education Labs who is also working with the city of Austin's **Office of Violence Prevention**,

and has appointed **Amber Goodwin** as the D.A.'s liaison with the OVP. Goodwin previously served on the city's **Task Force on Gun Violence**, which recommended creation of the OVP; Garza's office envisions funding targeted violence disruption strategies and coordinating between the agencies involved.

Successful efforts, Tillmon says, will frame gun violence as an issue of public health as



well as public safety. Research shows that in most communities, a small percentage of the population commits the majority of violent crimes. Targeting preventive efforts at those most at risk either of committing or being victimized by gun violence is akin to targeting infection controls, like COVID-19 vaccines, to those most likely to spread the disease or to suffer serious illness.

For OVP, Tillmon has produced two reports to help Austin leaders target their efforts. The first identifies **gun violence hot spots**, using Austin Police Department data from 2014 to 2018. The report found that seven neighborhoods in South Central, Central, and Northeast Austin accounted for about 50% of gun crimes in that timeframe. "The map will help Austin be strategic with resources," Tillmon told the *Chronicle*. "We want to go where violence is common and mitigate it, which can then produce a ripple effect throughout the larger community."

Tillmon's second report surveyed existing efforts in Austin, to identify which of them are ready to begin working at a larger scale. He told us that successful organizations need to have a public health approach, be embedded within at-risk communities, and employ people with similar demographics and life experiences as those being reached. Tillmon's analysis identified three potential OVP partners – **Youth Advocate Programs, Council on At-Risk Youth**, and the **SAFE Alliance** – which each have their own strengths; YAP, he concluded, is best-suited to offer expanded services in the hot spot neighborhoods.

"It's like with Alcoholics Anonymous," he said. "A person that's been through a similar journey knows what causes triggers, knows what to stay away from, knows how to fight the urges." Shared lived experience creates "credible messengers within communities that may be skeptical of institutions claiming they can help, which opens up the possibility for mentorship and other relationship building that can address the root causes of crime."

MIXED-INCOME, MIXED-USE TRAVIS FLATS OPEN IN NORTH LOOP

On Nov. 10, the **Travis County Commissioners Court** celebrated the grand opening of **Travis Flats Apartments**, a mixed-use, mixed-income development at 5310 Helen St., at 53½ St. and Airport Boulevard in the North Loop neighborhood. Rents for the floor plans with cute Austin-centric nicknames – "The Lady Bird," "The Zilker," "The Paramount," "The Moon Tower" – range from \$990-a-month studios to \$1,950-a-month three-bedrooms. That comes in well below Central Austin market rents; as of Nov. 11, the average rent on Apartment List for a studio apartment in Austin was \$1,644, and for a three-bedroom, \$2,702.

Of the complex's 146 units, 122 are affordable to those making 60% or less of area median income – currently \$59,340 for a family of four – with the remaining 24 market-rate units targeted to the "missing middle – a

population vulnerable to being priced out of the Austin area," as Travis County's press release describes it. In addition to a fitness center, media lounge, children's activity center, and Wi-Fi-enabled community room, the development includes 80,000 square feet of office space, which houses the county's **Health and Human Services**, **Veterans Services**, and **District Clerk Jury-Passport** offices.

Plans for Travis Flats began in 2016, when **Travis County Housing Finance Corporation** partnered with **DMA Development Company** and **Southwest Strategies Group** to redevelop a parking lot next to the county's North Campus office complex into both needed workspaces and affordable housing. Construction began in 2019 and was completed in June, financed by, among other loans, \$1.5 million in federal tax credits awarded by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs and \$2 million in bond and grant funds from the city of Austin. As a **S.M.A.R.T. Housing** development, Travis Flats also received \$750,000 in city fee waivers.

Aside from bolstering Austin's affordable housing stock, serving people who make "approximately \$9.00 to \$20.00 per hour," Travis Flats will offer educational services like ESL, GED preparation, job training, credit counseling, and "other supportive services that ensure employment stability and/or upward career mobility." The development is served by CapMetro route 350 and is close to an H-E-B and the ACC Highland campus; commissioners hope Travis Flats will yield "significant economic impact ... \$12M+ in terms of local construction related activity and ripple effect of spending income and generating local jobs," as well as provide "stable, high quality and affordable multifamily [homes], near employment opportunities, amenities, and quality schools." – *Lina Fisher*

Fed up with California's bureaucratic restrictions on everything from his business to his backyard, **Joe Lonsdale** uprooted his family and took his talents to Austin amid the COVID-19 pandemic. Lonsdale, who co-founded **Palantir Technologies** with

Trumpish tech goon **Peter Thiel**, told right-wing media mini-mogul **Ben Shapiro** last year that Texas offered a haven for "builders" like himself: " Why am I in [the Bay Area], where everyone hates the people who are creating things and where our city's so dysfunctional? We're building in Texas and it's really easy to do it."

So easy, it appears, that one can simply make up a university on the spot. Last week, Lonsdale signed on as a founding trustee of the **University of Austin**, which is *not* the University of Texas at Austin but

instead bills itself as a remedy to the "**culture of censorship**" on college campuses. Why Austin? As the "UATX" declared on its new website, "If it's good enough for **Elon Musk** and **Joe Rogan**, it's good enough for us."

The nascent university says it is simultaneously seeking accreditation through both

the **Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board** and the **Higher Learning Commission**, which is recognized by the **U.S. Department of Education** and the **Council for Higher Education Accreditation**. In an interview with the *Austin American-States*-

man earlier this week, UATX President **Pano Kanelos** said he hopes to create both a graduate program and an undergraduate college with between 3,000 and 4,000 students by 2024.

When it launched last week, UATX listed 31 members on its board of advisors; as the *Chronicle* went to press, that list now stands at 24. Notably, University of Chicago Chancellor **Robert** Zimmer on Monday announced that he had resigned from the board: "The new university made a number of statements


about higher education in general, largely quite critical, that diverged very significantly from my own views," he said in a statement. Meanwhile, culture warriors like advisory board member and *Atlantic* writer Caitlin Flanagan joked about students sleeping with their professors.



Like the majority of colleges, the University of Austin intends to organize itself as a not-for-profit institution, to which donors can make tax-exempt contributions. While it awaits a determination from the IRS, UATX is relying on Lonsdale's think-tank the Cicero Institute, which identifies itself as a mostly nonpartisan champion of the free market, to be its fiscal sponsor. Cicero's building at 2112 Rio Grande is currently being renovated to provide offices for 12 or so staff members. According to Judge Glock, the institute's senior director of policy and research, Cicero's role in running UATX is minimal: "We don't touch that or get involved with that ... we have no hand in the management or the rollout." In addition to funding from Lonsdale himself, **Hillel Ofek**, UATX's vice president of communications, told Salon that the school had already received more than 600 donations, including several seven-figure sums.

Andrew Gillen, a higher education expert at the Austin-based conservative **Texas Public Policy Foundation**, said UATX appears to be capitalizing on a market opportunity. "Not every university has turned, for lack of a better word, ambivalent, if not outright hostile toward dissenting voices on campus, but a lot of them have." But he, too, cautioned against getting too excited. "It's one thing to say you're gonna do that stuff. It's another to actually do it."

AISD Falls Far Short of Enrollment Goals



For almost a decade, Austin Independent School

District has seen its student population decline, and this year has continued the trend despite the district's concerted efforts over the summer to boost enrollment. This year, only **74,727** students were enrolled in AISD for the school year that began in August, down from 75,075 in 2020-21, according to data released last week. That decline is far less than AISD has seen in years past, indicating that the district may have successfully stopped the enrollment tailspin prompted by the **COVID-19 pandemic**. (The district lost more than 4.000 students over the summer of 2020.)

But underlying factors continue to make it hard for AISD to attract and retain students. A 2016 AISD report forecasting the next decade's student populations predicted that AISD, which at the time had more than 83,000 students, would see enrollment dip below 80,000 in 2021. The school shutdowns, concerns about the efficacy of online learning, and subsequent dropouts spurred by the pandemic contributed to a massive, unanticipated acceleration of that decline, but the causes foreseen in 2016 hold true: "Lower birth rates combined with the lack of affordable housing will have a negative impact on projected growth at the lower grades [that will] lower projected numbers for the higher grades towards the end of the ten-year period."

AISD media relations specialist **Eddie Villa** told us that this year's enrollment loss reflects families moving to nearby districts with lower costs of living more than it does losses to private or charter schools. Those rising prices continue to affect teachers as well; in the AISD budget approved in June, teacher raises were conditioned upon an enrollment goal of 77,331 students. That budget already dipped into AISD cash reserves to close a \$43.6 million deficit, but missing the enrollment goal by more than 2,500 students "results in an additional \$18.6 million loss, bringing the district's total deficit to \$62.2 million," Villa said.

Villa indicated AISD is "already taking steps to reduce this shortfall in the current budget year, with the goal of ending the year with a balanced budget, [while] positioning ourselves to potentially give a compensation increase next year due to escalating costs of living in the Austin area." This means leaving vacancies unfilled for the time being. – *Morgan O'Hanlon*

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Danger Dead Ahead

As D.C. dollars dry up, the rickety health care system for millions of uninsured Texans heads for a fiscal cliff

Everything's bigger in Texas – except for the system that's supposed to provide lifesaving health care to millions of its most vulnerable residents. About 5 million Texans live without health insurance, the most of any state. That has only worsened during the COVID-19 pandemic and the economic shocks it's created; an estimated 1.6 million Texans lost employer-sponsored insurance in the first three months of the pandemic, between March and May of 2020. All these people rely on a threadbare safety net system of subsidized clinics and hospital emergency rooms for which the state has been loath to provide resources.

The simplest and most obvious way to address this problem, and to reduce Texas' uninsured population by about one-third, would be to expand Medicaid to all lowincome adults, as the Affordable Care Act was designed to do before the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that states could opt out of the expansion. Texas did so, in a petty political power play that it has refused to reconsider as the state's ruling Republican party gets more ornery, even as the growing health care burden threatens to bankrupt hospitals across the state. During the 87th Texas Legislature, Democrats filed dozens of bills aimed at closing the state's immense coverage gap, including with customized "Texas solutions" for expanding Medicaid that gained bipartisan support but still failed to pass (and likely would have been vetoed by Gov. Greg Abbott if they had).

Because of the recalcitrance of a dozen GOP-led states, several million Americans live in health care limbo, not poor enough to

qualify for traditional Medicaid in their states but not wealthy enough to be eligible for the subsidies available through the ACA's Health Insurance Marketplace, which is having its open enrollment period for 2022 right now.

Texas is the largest of those states, and the Kaiser Family Foundation – the nation's leading source of health care data – estimates that 1.4 million uninsured adults between 18 and 65 would be covered if the state dropped its resistance to Medicaid expansion. That would mean \$9 would come from the feds for every \$1 Texas invested in Medicaid; combined with incentives and sweeteners available under the American Rescue Plan Act, KFF estimates the state could bring in \$5 billion over the next two years.

So as it's evaded the dread clutches of "Obamacare," has Texas been going it alone, paying out of its own pockets for the care its doctors and hospitals provide to the uninsured? Not exactly. Having turned down the ACA Medicaid dollars, Texas has leaned heavily on a different federal funding agreement to support safety net providers and their low-income patients. The

About 5 million Texans live without health insurance, the most of any state.

agreement is known as the Section 1115 waiver; that portion of the federal Social Security Act can give states "additional flexibility to design and improve their programs [and] demonstrate and evaluate state-specific policy approaches to better serving Medicaid populations," according to the U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, or CMS.

In Texas, the 1115 waiver has provided billions of dollars since 2012, flowing into two pools from which the state's providers can draw funds. One is specifically for uncompensated care (UC) to uninsured patients, mostly in hospitals. The other was intended as a bonus: the Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment (DSRIP, pronounced "diss-rip") program, which incentivizes regional providers to innovate health care delivery for low-income or uninsured Texans, whether or not they're covered by Texas' stingiest-in-the-nation Medicaid program. (It's almost impossible for adults who are not pregnant or disabled to qualify for Texas Medicaid.)

Those billions of dollars – upwards of \$15 billion for DSRIP projects alone in the last decade - are disappearing if Texas continues to not get its act together. An extension of the 1115 waiver for another decade had been granted to the state by the Trump administration but was rescinded by the Biden team, which felt the Texas Health and Human Services Commission hadn't gotten sufficient public and stakeholder input for its proposals. If HHSC and CMS fail to come to terms, the waiver expires in September 2022. The DSRIP program has already ended, and the mechanism the state wants to use to replace it is also being negotiated. As it stands, the rickety vehicle that is the Texas health care system is heading over a fiscal cliff, with the well-being of 1 in 5 Texans on board.

NOT ACCORDING TO PLAN

Though intended as a bonus program to fund demonstration projects, DSRIP has been used in Texas as a major funding stream for its safety net providers and hospitals. Those receiving 1115 waiver funds (both DSRIP and UC) participate in one of 20 Regional Healthcare Partnerships (RHPs) around the state, each with an "anchor" agency. The collaborations fostered by the RHPs to work across regions to

address community health needs are seen by many as DSRIP's major success. For the first five years of the program, between 2012 and 2017, HHSC estimates that about 40% of the state's DSRIP funding went to care for low-income and uninsured Texans.

Back in 2011, when CMS and HHSC negotiated the terms of the Texas waiver, it was still mandated by the ACA that the state would expand Medicaid at some point. As such, DSRIP was designed to provide funds to build out the state's provider network in preparation for an influx of Medicaid enrollees. It was only a few months after the waiver's approval, however, that SCOTUS ruled in *National Federation of Independent Business v. Sebelius* that while the ACA as a whole was legal, its Medicaid mandates were not, and states could choose not to expand their programs.

"CMS always had the intention that [DSRIP] payments were to incentivize the system to improve and, ultimately, be able to integrate their system improvements into the Medicaid program and support the state of Texas that way," explained Katie Coburn, director of regional health care at Central Health. The tax-supported Travis County local health care district serves as the anchor for RHP 7, interpreting 1115 waiver policies and requirements and collecting and reporting data on community health needs. The RHP region encompasses Bastrop, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, and Travis counties; its DSRIP providers include Austin Public Health, local mental health authority Integral Care, and hospitals including Central Texas Medical Center

in San Marcos, Dell Children's Medical Center, and the St. David's and Ascension Seton systems.

Also part of RHP 7 is the Community Care Collaborative (CCC), Central Health's public-private partnership with Ascension Seton, which purchases services from providers to care for underserved and underinsured Travis County residents. The largest of these is the CommUnityCare network of primary care clinics

in Travis County, which is itself governed under the auspices of Central Health. For the CCC, said Coburn, the average annual fiscal impact of its DSRIP program is approximately \$53 million; to date, the CCC has received \$510 million in DSRIP payments, and RHP 7 providers have received \$1.4 billion over the 10-year life of the DSRIP program. Those funds have been used to improve outcomes in behavioral health and chronic disease management



(diabetes and heart disease), cancer screening, and primary care and prevention, among other focus areas.

This summer, less than two months before DSRIP was scheduled to expire in September, CMS offered Texas a one-year, \$2.49 billion extension and said it would continue to work with HHSC on its transition plan. Those funds are not yet flowing, as talks continue between HHSC and CMS

about the one-year offer and about the set of six state-directed payment programs (SDPs) Texas has proposed to succeed DSRIP over the next decade.

Two of those SDPs already exist and CMS has also offered to temporarily extend their current funding: the Uniform Hospital Rate Increase Program, which boosts payments to hospitals who treat Medicaid patients, and the Quality Incentive Payment

Program (QIPP) for nursing home facilities. Meanwhile, Texas has proposed four new SDPs for its DSRIP transition – including programs to further enhance payments to hospitals and to their physicians, support behavioral health care, and meet rural needs. This Tuesday, Nov. 16, HHSC notified stakeholders that it had received approvals from CMS for QIPP and for its new behavioral health program, retroactive to Sept. 1.

Unlike DSRIP to date, these new programs will largely benefit Texans who are already enrolled in Medicaid, not the uninsured, said Anne Dunkelberg, who oversees health care policy at the Austin-based public policy organization Every Texan. That loss of funding concerns her: "The fear is, obviously, that it's even harder for uninsured Texans to get the care they need than it was before, and the health care providers across Texas that were benefiting from that funding may be stretched further and may have to cut back on the services they provide," she said. Moreover, while Texans covered by Medicaid have difficulty finding primary care providers who'll treat them in many parts of the state, the providers who will such as CommUnityCare - won't be able to access these proposed substitutes to DSRIP.

Consumer advocates say Texas needs all of these fiscal supports for safety net health care and Medicaid enrollees *and* also needs to work harder to produce a coverage solution for its millions of uninsured. "We don't have any trouble with uncompensated care pools, we don't have any trouble with directed payments," said Dunkelberg, "but they are not an acceptable substitute for providing people with comprehensive health coverage."

THE STATE'S SHRINKING SHARE

Over the last two decades, the Texas Legislature and GOP governors have worked to minimize the actual state funding for safety net health care as much as possible. This has happened, explains Dunkelberg, by lawmakers creating a "raft of ever-changing supplemental payments



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

and pushing the 'state' share of those payments onto local governments and provider taxes – both of which are subject to their own sets of federal law and [regulations]."

Like the ACA's Medicaid expansion provisions, the current 1115 waiver requires Texas to put up a certain share of the money

to draw down the larger share of federal dollars. Yet Texas relies on local governments and other public entities, such as Central Health and its support from Travis County property taxpayers, for its share of DSRIP and UC costs. States passing their fiscal obligations for Medicaid and safety net programs onto local funders and providers is part of a larger national trend, said Dunkelberg, but "Texas is one of the most reliant states on that external, outside-of-state-budget funding." As it's become more common, CMS has become more watchful of how states have avoided their

own fiscal responsibilities, said Dunkelberg. "It's been an issue in every administration – not just one [political] party."

The federal Office of Inspector General performed an audit of Texas' DSRIP program focusing on two of the 20 RHPs – Central Texas' RHP 7, and RHP 9 in the Dallas area. In the first five years of Texas' DSRIP program, the audit found that within RHP 7, two entities received the majority of DSRIP payments: the CCC (\$244.6 million) and Seton (\$201.3 million). According to the OIG's findings, Central Health used its own funds to cover the share that should have been paid by the state, allowing Texas to "inappropriately" receive just under \$84 million in federal "matching" funds that the audit recommends be refunded, along with steps HHSC should take to keep such "impermissible provider-related donations" from occurring in the future.

> The audit notes that HHSC did not concur with these two recommendations. In a written comment to the Chronicle, a Central Health spokesperson said its lawyers advised the organization to refrain from extensive comments on the audit, but added, "Central Health also disagrees with the OIG's findings and recommendations." Central Health is not aware of any further developments regarding the audit or potential enforcement of penalties, said the spokesperson. In its Nov. 16 notice to stakeholders, HHSC said, without making reference to the OIG audits, that it had "received a letter

from CMS regarding non-federal share funding" and would soon "set up a call to review expectations with providers."

HELP FROM THE BUILD BACK BETTER ACT?

As the stalemate between Texas and D.C. continues, another potential coverage solution for low-income and uninsured Texans is now being debated in Congress as part of the proposed Build Back Better Act. Under its current framework, the BBB's coverage provisions emphasize strengthening the



Affordable Care Act and closing the Medicaid coverage gap. One provision would reduce premiums for people buying coverage through the ACA Marketplace through 2025, while another key measure would allow individuals whose income is under the poverty line to newly qualify for subsidized marketplace coverage, also through 2025. U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, who chairs the health subcommittee of the House Ways and Means Committee - which gives him substantial influence over Medicaid funding - has for years proposed ways for localities to work directly with CMS and go around balky state agencies like HHSC, some of which have worked their way into

the Build Back Better conversation.

The provisions currently in the BBB framework, however, would actually reduce the funds that already flow to Texas hospitals for safety net care for both Medicaid and non-Medicaid low-income patients. In a Nov. 3 letter to the state's congressional delegation, the Texas Hospital Association implored lawmakers to eliminate these proposed cuts. "We're happy to have those payments reduced as more folks become insured," said John Hawkins, senior vice president of government relations and incoming president of THA. "But maybe phasing [the cuts] would be more appropriate than just making these arbitrary. It doesn't make sense to expand coverage for folks, but then at the same time be undermining the actual system that's going to be providing that care." Hawkins said the BBB provisions allow for more dollars to come to Texas than HHSC would otherwise draw down, but in THA's view, its proposed cuts are "overly punitive to providers in these nonexpansion states for decisions that are, by and large, outside of our control."

So who *does* control these decisions? The state's health care agencies that have already been overmatched by the coronavirus for nearly two years? The fervent GOP primary base to which Abbott is desperately pandering in an attempt to keep his job? A future Democratic successor? The 88th Legislature? It's hard to say right now, but hopefully the approaching fiscal cliff will serve to wake up complacent Texas leaders and put the safety net health care system on a safer path forward.

Section 1115 waiver: A

multiyear, multibillion-dollar funding agreement between the Texas Health and Human Services Commission and the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services that gives Texas federal funds to help the state partly offset the costs of Texas hospitals and safety net providers providing care to low-income or uninsured patients.

Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment (DSRIP):

As part of Texas' current 1115 waiver, this funding program incentivizes participating entities to come up with innovations for delivering health care services to low-income or uninsured patients.

Uncompensated care (UC): Also part of Texas' 1115 waiver, UC funding reimburses Texas hospitals for providing care to uninsured patients.

Medicald expansion:

When states elect to expand Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act, they receive 90% (or more) of the funding to cover people with household incomes up to 138% of the federal poverty level. In Texas, for adults who are not disabled, pregnant, or recently postpartum, that income threshold is a mere 12% of the poverty level.

ACA Medicaid cov-

erage gap: In states that have not expanded Medicaid, uninsured adults whose incomes are too high to qualify for coverage under their state's current criteria but are still under the federal poverty level threshold can't qualify for subsidies through the Affordable Care Act's Health Insurance Marketplace.

Regional Healthcare Partnership (RHP):

There are 20 geographically defined RHPs in Texas that include participating public and private hospitals and providers. Under Texas' current 1115 waiver, an entity must participate in an RHP in order to receive UC or DSRIP funding.

The Contemporary's Crit Group Reunion questions what it means to be an Austin artist

A few months ago, I wrote an article for this paper in which I referred to an artist working in Austin as a "local artist" in the headline. Later, this artist generously shared the article on their personal Instagram, and an older, more established artist, who also happens to work in Austin, commented "Congrats...but you know I hate the term 'local' – you're Austin based!!!"

Of course, I had used the word "local" merely to underscore that this artist, who had recently won a big award, lives in Austin, not to pejoratively imply that their work was suited to the local level, as opposed to a national or international scale. But the brief comment made me ask myself, "If I had been writing for a New York City paper about a New York City-based artist, would I have called them a 'local' artist?" Probably not. So why was I comfortable calling an artist of exceptional talent, who, by the way, shows in cities across the U.S., a "local" artist? Are artists who live in hubs like New York, Los Angeles, Berlin, and Tokyo "above" words like local? What does that suggest about how people think of artists living in Austin, or any city or town outside of these so-called "centers" for contemporary art?

The Contemporary Austin is beginning to ask these questions as well. Their current two-part show, Crit Group Reunion, turns a long-overdue spotlight on the robust community of visual artists working in Austin, a move that strikes a deeper conversation about how major institutions should invest in the existing arts ecosystems in the places where they are located. In a first for the Contemporary, all of the featured artists are alumni of its Crit Group program, which was started in 2014 to give folks a chance to share their work and receive feedback, participate in professional development oppor-

tunities, and deepen ties within Austin's art community. Each year, less than 10 artists are selected to join Crit Group. Normally, at the end of the annual program, each cohort exhibits their work at grayDUCK Gallery in East Austin. This time, in a first for the Contemporary, their work will be on display at its Downtown Jones Center gallery.

The first chapter of the exhibition, "Facing the World," which opened on September 11, loosely focused on how sheltering in place drew attention to the natural and domestic environments that surround us. The second chapter, "Facing Each Other," which opens November 20, will explore how compounding health and social crises changed the ways we relate to each other and see ourselves in larger social frameworks.

So what motivated a major institution like the Contemporary to suddenly show these Austin artists in the museum itself, as opposed to a smaller partnering gallery? Robin K. Williams, the associate curator involved with the show, explained that "COVID hit, and everything was thrown up in the air. ... The museum shut down, and it caused us to have to reconfigure the exhibition schedule." Williams also mentioned that as the museum was confronting these abrupt changes, it ushered in a new executive director, sharon maidenberg, in summer 2020, when protests following George Floyd's murder roused more acute attention to issues like equity and visibility.

These internal and societal shifts caused the institution, like many others, to confront which artists they had historically shown and why they were selected. Perhaps more importantly, they were also prompted to address which artists had been excluded from these opportunities in the first place. Williams recalled that the conversations occurring at the time generated strong feelings among the Contemporary's staff to produce an exhibition that specifically served the city of Austin. She noted that many of her colleagues shared the new leadership's goal "to see the museum become really strongly rooted in the local community, to the same degree that it has been functioning on a national and international art scale."

Authentic community service had always been at the heart of Crit Group, so highlighting this program seemed like an actionable, meaningful way to express the institution's renewed commitments to local and regional artists and audiences. Williams said that bringing the artists together for the show "reactivated the community building that was part and parcel to the whole ethos of the program itself."

As planning began, the curators made a decisive effort to listen to and address artists' evolving needs. Williams and Crit Group co-founder Andrea Mellard began the process by hosting reunions of each cohort over Zoom, followed by individual studio visits with all 52 of the artists in the exhibition. During the process, the curators listened to artists describe newfound difficulties – like decreased job security, loss of studio space or time, and increased family care responsibilities – but also unlikely reprieves, like less social obligations and more leniency with deadlines.

Williams stressed that "everything was pretty stark" in summer 2020, when these conversations were occurring: "A lot of museums, and especially smaller institutions, had to cancel shows, which meant that artists who had shows on the books suddenly didn't anymore." The prospect of having an exhibition open in fall 2021, when they imagined the severity of the pandemic would be declining (in reality, the show's opening coincided with a COVID surge caused by the Delta variant), became a hopeful beacon on the horizon to look toward.

Nearly all of the work featured in Crit Group Reunion was made during 2020, meaning it ran the risk of being just another pandemic group show, one of those forced, underdeveloped, and at times, painfully disjointed group exhibitions that institutions seem to think will provide some profound reflection on the last 20-odd months. However, most of the collection does not address the pandemic at all, but is rather, to use Williams' words, "conditioned by that moment in time."

As artist Virginia Lee Montgomery approached her contribution to the show, she wanted to create a gentle, immersive piece that described the experience of being freed from home confinement. Over the course of the pandemic, Montgomery raised luna moth caterpillars in her Hyde Park studio. As she observed them between remote

work sessions for her day job, she realized the moths were a "wonderful symbol to embody hope, metamorphosis regeneration, and emergence." Montgomery then produced O, LUNA! a striking four-minute video in the exhibition, which shows the moths through their maturation, performing delicate functions like ringing bells and interacting with an insect-sized camera that Montgomery made specially for them.

This spirit of generosity, wonder, and empathy also surfaced for Steve Parker, who produced a sound performance at Laguna Gloria in tandem with the Jones Center exhibition. Parker has degrees in music and

mathematics, and before Crit Group, had never shown work in an art gallery. When I asked Parker about what he was thinking as he designed the Laguna Gloria performance, he brought up Hildegard von Bingen, a 12th-century German abbess, mystic, author, and composer, who "was interested in the potential for sound and its healing properties ... and how the practice of listening deliberately can be an act of self-care." Parker reflected on the healing potential of music as he created *Foghorn Elegy*, the first large-scale performance he's conducted since the onset of the pandemic. He says, "I just really enjoy making art with other people, and this is, I think, going to be one of those experiences that is really powerful."

Crit Group was conducted virtually in 2020, and the Contemporary is still evaluating how and if they should continue the program, or perhaps modify it in the future. However, the artist alumni said it had been invaluable to them. Montgomery described it as "a way of quite literally sharing the knowledge that we each gained from being, in many instances, lifelong practitioners of art." She explained that a viewer "might not necessarily look at an artwork on the wall of the gallery and [think], 'Oh, this is made by someone who has invested a lot of time, energy, education, schooling, and decades of participating in a rigorous subculture to make it [happen]." Crit Group acknowledges the "subterranean labor" that artists engage in, and that seems to be part of its unusual beauty and functionality.

The retrospective has personal significance for Dawn Okoro, whose colored pencil self-portrait will be included in the second chapter the reunion. She recalled her own experiences visiting the Jones Center in the early Aughts: "I remember

art scale."

looking at the artist's work and thinking, 'Wow, how can I get my work here?'... It seems like you have to go and show in New York or internationally before you can come and show here." After participating in Crit Group, and then going on to show in New York and internationally, Okoro said that having her own work in the Jones Center "feels like things have come full circle for mo."

Crit Group Reunion celebrates the vital cultural contributions of visual artists living in Austin by placing their work in a premiere space in the highly trafficked Downtown. Particularly in a city better known for its more estab-

lished music and film cultures, an exhibition like Crit Group Reunion has the potential to put Austin on the map as a major visual arts destination. The show, and the program that inspired it, offers a prime example of how an institution can lift emerging artists into much greater visibility. After all, the artists in this show are not just "local." They're Austin-based.

The first weekend covered the West; the second weekend covered the West and the East; this final weekend (Sat.-Sun., Nov. 20-21, noon-6pm) wraps up with just the East. (You can pick up a free studio tour map at any Austin Public Library branch while supplies last; but you've got to become a member of Big Medium to earn a copy of the Austin Studio Tour Art Book.) For these final five recommendations, we've focused on studios and galleries that also offer, among their larger art objects, smaller, luggage-carryable items – ideal for gifting to your lucky family or friends, say, when you go visiting around year's end.

RYAN MCKERLEY

He's a past master, as the phrase goes, of the art of pottery. But Ryan McKerley is also, we'll insist, a future master of the same practice: The man's been working his craft in this city since 1995, and whether the pieces are functional or purely aesthetic – or, more often the case, a stunning combination of both – they're sure to be among the loveliest objects in your home. And of course a thing of beauty (thank you, Mr. Keats) is a joy forever. Cups, bowls, saucers, platters – you name it, McKerley's elevated its utility toward a sophisticated style that'll still be valued decades from now. She's "a storyteller, writer, performer, and creator of self-portraits," this richly talented local. 

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Hyde Park Theatre's My Season With the Astros, Expos, and Phillies

ONE MAN'S SPORTS OBSESSION BECOMES A CHARMING ONE-ACT EXPLORATION INTO MEDIOCRITY by bob abelman

We all have preoccupations, obsessions, and passions. But Ken Webster – actor/director/producing artistic director at Hyde Park Theatre in Central Austin – also has a black box performance space at his disposal and the creative wherewithal to put his sports fixation on the page and then on the stage. His *My Season With the Astros, Expos, and Phillies* is a one-man monologue about John Bateman, an unremarkable professional baseball player who spent 10 mediocre years with the Houston Colt .45s/Astros, Montreal Expos, and Philadelphia Phillies during the 1960s and 1970s.

Bateman began his professional baseball career in 1962 with a team that the *Sporting News* described as "a valley with very small peaks." It was so bad that when the rookie Bateman was elected to bat in the coveted cleanup position typically reserved for the team's best hitter, he was batting below the Mendoza Line – a baseball expression named after shortstop Mario Mendoza, whose low batting average (.200) is taken to define the threshold of incompetent hitting. Team manager Harry Craft was quoted as saying, "With our club, it doesn't really matter who bats there." Bateman's first professional at-bat was, as one would expect, a strike out.

A solidly unexceptional career .230 hitter, the perpetually overweight, often injured, and playful but easy to anger Bateman always played for losing teams, never played in the postseason, and never made the All-Star team. A poster child for overachievement, the then-Astro ballplayer became a favorite for a young Webster, who wanted to be (but never was) a catcher and batted a mere .100

catcher and batted a mere .100 on his Houston Little League team. Bateman, the personification of what Aristotle referred to as hamartia, or fatally flawed, is perfect imperfect fodder for a stage play.

In 2011, Webster turned his love of Bateman, his unbridled passion for baseball, and a mind jam-packed with trivia into a popu-

lar Twitter feed, where he assumed the voice of Bateman and commented on his times and tribulations during the 1966 season. Those humorous tweets became the core of Webster's oneman show, which was first performed in 2012. It has since popped up in short form at a few of Austin's FronteraFests and is now receiving an extended encore staging as Hyde Park Theatre's first venture into live performance since the start of the pandemic.

I remember clearly proofreading that week's Ommunity column on print day, and double-checking a fact on Austin Pride's website only to find an hoursold post declaring the parade canceled. The column got a last minute rewrite - really. like, a few hours before we went to print and all those pieces were tucked away.

That is, until this week – Trans Awareness Week – and we at *The Austin Chronicle* Qmmunity section are going to make you highly aware of several very cool, very interesting, and very exciting trans folks in our local scene. Which scene? Why, several scenes, in fact – art, music, performance, health care, etc. Trans people are everywhere, and they are multitudinous in their talents – a community deserving of celebration, if I do say so my trans self. Saturday marks the arrival of another Trans Day of Remembrance. DAY TRIPS by gerald e. mcleod

The **Fulton Fishing Pier** in **Rockport/Fulton** reopened this fall after being destroyed four years ago by **Hurricane Harvey**.

That might not sound like such a big deal unless you're an avid angler or pier walker, but Fulton **Mayor Kelli Cole** summed up what the \$1.9 million public-private financed project means to the community: "This project marks the final step of our town in recovering from the devastation wrought by Hurricane Harvey."

You should know about the sister towns of Fulton-Rockport in **Aransas County** that there are no high-rises; these are still very much fishing villages. The area is not wealthy and is mostly rural. Without a beach directly on the **Gulf of Mexico**, the tourist industry attracts mostly fishermen and artists.

In August 2017, Rockport/Fulton took a direct hit from Hurricane Harvey, and the towns went through a meat grinder of 130 mph winds. The county courthouse is still in a repurposed grocery store. It says a lot about the resilience of the community that the area has bounced back better than ever.

There's plenty to do in Rockport/Fulton: Visit the **Texas Maritime Museum** and/or the **Rockport Center for the Arts**, shop in the galleries and stores along **Austin Street**, check out the **Fulton Mansion State Historic Site**, take a whooping crane or sunset cruise, walk the beach on an inlet of the bay, dine at **GLOW** or **Moondog Seaside Eatery**, or go fishing.



The Fulton Fishing Pier is in a small park at the end of **Chaparral Street** at 402 N. Fulton Beach Rd. The lighted, 1,200-foot pier is open 24/7 with an attendant during daylight hours. Admission is \$5 per pole with a maximum of four poles per angler. Pier walking is free.

Diego Fagundez, ATXFC Broadcasters "Tee" It Up for Charity

Typically, the first few weeks following the end of a long season are a special time for professional athletes. A rare chance to completely detach from competition, take some time away from the sports they play, and enjoy some serious R&R. Austin FC winger Diego Fagundez is no different, especially after playing 2,528 high-intensity minutes out of a possible 3,060 during the season. But Fagundez laced up his cleats once more over the weekend to participate in the Austin Soccer Foundation's fifth annual charity footgolf tournament, which supports a scholarship program for high school student-athletes in the Austin area.

That's right, footgolf. One attempts to kick a soccer ball from tee box to hubcap-sized hole in as few strikes as possible across an 18-hole golf course. As you might expect, Fagundez is good at this. He and his father, Washington, left as co-champions of the day with a

17-under-par round of 53. "If it wasn't for this, I wouldn't touch a soccer ball in like three weeks," Fagundez halfjoked. Austin FC's joint-leading goalscorer rarely shies away from an opportunity to spend time with local soccer fans and organizations when there's fun to be had. In this case, club television commentators Adrian Healey and Mike Lahoud (an MLS veteran of seven years) joined in on the four-ball.


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Time Well Spent

How Carnitas El Güero got so good at its namesake dish

It's often in tight confines that you find focus and clarity. That's what Mexico Cityborn Gustavo Reyes found in the tiny kitchen of the Texaco Stassney Foodmart in South Austin, when he opened Carnitas El Güero back in December 2016 with only \$200. What started as a cash-only counter doing takeout only with no seats in a gas station has slowly grown into a mini-empire. There's a second location with a full kitchen (and a carnitas-focused expanded menu) on North Lamar that opened in early 2021. A third location in San Antonio just opened in September. A fourth location is planned for Dallas in the next couple of months.

Tender, rich, umami-laden, and fatty without being greasy, the carnitas here are truly epic, bordering on a religious experience. The secret to the carnitas at El Güero is that there is no secret. Much like the great barbecue or sushi in the world, it's just about keeping it simple and doing it right. Reyes is open about his technique and what goes into his carnitas: It's pork lard, meat, garlic, salt, and a little bit of sugar. "And cooking it slowly, slowly over time," he explained over the phone.

Carnitas is usually composed of a mix of different cuts of meat, and at El Güero,

Reyes uses a combination of pork butt, ribs, belly, stomach, and skin, slowly cooked in lard in a cazo, the enormous pot in the center of the kitchen. It's similar to the French confit cooking technique. The default and best way to order the carnitas here is "surtido," and you'll get a mix of everything, chopped to order. Or you can get it however you want: lean, fatty, extra skin, or no skin. The skin is excellent, and an essential part of what makes for the ineffable and gelatinous mouthfeel.

The options at the South Austin location are limited. There's the orden personal (personal combo) for \$12.99 that comes with a half pound of carnitas, a mess of corn tortillas, two kinds of salsa, pickled onions, cilantro, lime, and a small, crispy doradita, a deepfried tortilla pocket with a mix of meats found at the bottom of the pot (aka achicalada). You can also order carnitas by the pound, with all the fixings, for \$19.99 - it's the most common order. There's even a party combo for \$350 that comes with 30 pounds of carnitas, ensuring a very porky party. They do a brisk takeout business, as it's especially popular with residents of the nearby Stassney Woods apartment complex. And it can get busy. During peak hours, especially week-

ends, you will find yourself waiting in a line that snakes around a gas station's aisles. Waiting in line is a sport in Austin, and here it's very much worth the wait.

While there's care and consistency in the cooking, there's also attention to detail, like warming up the nixtamalized corn tortillas (imported from Houston) on a flat top with lard. Or opting to make spicy pickled onions with habanero and oregano as a condiment (versus serving the onions raw, like many places). When it comes to the

salsas, it often feels like the standard red and green you get at most taquerias all come out of the same commissary kitchen. But at El Güero, the salsas are different, and more importantly, better. The red salsa's made with chile morita, a smoked jalapeño, with a

rich, deep smoky flavor; the green is made with tomatillo and habanero, for a brighter, spicier note. Both complement the fatty unctuousness of the carnitas tremendously.

In March of 2021, Reyes took over a restaurant space on North Lamar – right in the middle of what *Texas Monthly* Taco Editor José Ralat calls "North Austin's taco mecca" – and opened a brick-and-mortar location of Carnitas El Güero. The space is your standard taqueria, except it's decorated with papel picado featuring the Carnitas El Güero logo. There's soccer on most of the TV screens during the day, with families crowded together, jostling with elbows to make tacos from a pile of carnitas in the center of the table. There's loud music at night – it's open until 2am – and there's sometimes even karaoke on the weekends.

The full-size kitchen on Lamar has allowed Reyes to offer a much more expand-

ed menu than the location down south. Carnitas remain the core of the menu, but there are new options like the fantastic \$10.99 carnitas tortas, simply dressed with avocado and mayonnaise and a pickled jalapeño on the side. The standout new menu item is the pozole, with a flavorful, spicy broth made from a pig's head and guajillo and ancho chiles. It's served with hominy, and, of course, carnitas. Rich yet delicate, it can most definitely rival menu-


do as a hangover cure.


Speaking of hangover cures, you very much want to order a cantarito, the tequila cocktail out of Jalisco served in a clay pot rimmed with chile powder. Carnitas El Güero's are big and refreshing, made with Squirt and freshly squeezed orange,

grapefruit, and lime juice. There are also Mexican draft beers and micheladas. The expanded menu includes completely serviceable gorditas, quesadillas, and tostadas, and there's an evening/late night menu (6pm-2am) that includes \$2.99 tacos with a variety of meats like al pastor, tripe, chicken tinga, and beef fajita. The tacos are perfectly fine, but if you're at a place called Carnitas El Güero, you should be getting the carnitas.

You're not hurting for taco options in Austin. And while there are excellent carnitas to be had in town – La Michoacana Meat Market, El Tacorrido, or Paprika come to mind – a lot of places just serve a basic oven-roasted pork shoulder that's then shredded and maybe crisped up on a griddle. But what Carnitas El Güero is doing with pork is nothing short of extraordinary. It's what happens when you focus, over time.

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

Lizards of Sixth Street

John Valley says the conspiracy joke's on us in Austinmade shocker *The Pizzagate Massacre*

Back in 2020, John Valley had a problem. The first-time feature director's movie. Austin-shot character piece Duncan, could not get into festivals. At all. Just couldn't get arrested. "We thought we were dead in the water," Valley said of his movie's 2020 status. "The reactions we were getting were terrible. The movie was getting turned down left and right for festival slots. Several of them said, 'We can't show this because this is an ongoing issue.' I think they were absolutely afraid the content would attract attention from lunatics but I also think you can write the best drama in the world and unless you have A-list actors, nobody gives a shit."

Valley finally booked the movie, about a far-right conspiracy theorist and an aspiring journalist who team up to investigate a possible confluence of cults and lizard people, into the horror-based Nightmares Film Festival. That's where it promptly won an audience award. Earlier this year it played the streaming Panic Fest, another horror-based festival, where it was again embraced. The horror audience got it right away. "It felt like a genre film, a conspiracy horror," Valley said. "And Duncan is this creature, this sort of monstrous character, and the reality of these fringe movements is pretty horrific."

Valley knew what he had to do: Embrace the audience right back.

Duncan is now known as The Pizzagate Massacre, and the new title fits the movie perfectly. Starring Tinus Seaux as Duncan, the QAnon type, and Alexandria Payne as the journalist Karen Black (with a frankly terrifying Lee Eddy as an Alex Jones-type television ranter), The Pizzagate Massacre reveals itself to be a pitch-black satire. And the rebranding worked: In July, Archstone Entertainment picked it up for distribution, and it arrives on VOD this week.

All the delays have, fortunately and unfortunately, worked in Valley's favor. "The market is pretty bleak now for small dramas and it's much better for genre," he said. Initially, Valley was angry that folks weren't picking up what his movie was putting down. "I was upset that the movie wasn't landing with people," he said. "And I decided when I retitled it, after folks were actively dismissing it, I figured come hell or high water, the title was going to tell you what the hell this movie is about."

Then again, as the Kyle Rittenhouse trial wraps up and with the civil action against some of the Charlottesville alt-right rioters ongoing, Pizzagate somehow feels even more sickeningly relevant now than it did 12 months ago. (Even allegedly lefto Austin isn't immune to far-right activity – it's entirely possible that the folks who hung antisemitic banners could tell you that the lizard people canard started as a conspiracy theory about Jews. Oy vey.)



Valley says one group of producers he talked to likened it to a "Southern Gothic *Taxi Driver*," which thrilled him. "I was reminded of the idea that *Taxi Driver* is a werewolf movie and *Pizzagate* is also about weird, isolated individuals. It's scary to think these people are living amongst us."

Ultimately, *Pizzagate Massacre* has a complicated relationship with Austin. Valley definitely needed some footage of Duncan on Sixth Street. "If you're a conservative type who looks at Austin from the outside," Valley said, "I think you might see all of Austin as represented by Sixth Street, where it's just debauchery all the time. It's appropriate that Duncan has some revelations in this place."

But there's a darker stream at work, something perhaps baked into a certain libertarian Texas mindset. There's no question you can draw a straight line from the JFK conspiracy dude in *Slacker* directly to someone like Duncan. What was once a vaguely amusing aspect of Eighties counterculture has now become fully weaponized. Valley emits a grim chuckle. "If you make movies in Austin, you do your level best to swing away from *Slacker*, which is an incredible movie from a filmmaker I love. But Alex Jones is in Linklater's work (*Waking Life*, specifically). I doubt he will be anymore but, as I have said when talking about this movie, this sort of thing is funny until it's not. And it's really not anymore."

Since the movie was made, Valley has talked with former InfoWars employees, some of whom have wondered why he would make a movie about something so horrific. "I said, 'Look, I'm never going to make a movie that is more offensive than what actually happened at InfoWars. Don't be mad at me for the story you were selling.'"

D: Jane Campion; with Benedict Cumberbatch, Kirsten Dunst, Jesse Plemons, Kodi Smit-McPhee, Thomasin McKenzie, Genevieve Lemon, Keith Carradine, Frances Conroy, Peter Carroll. (R, 126 min.)

The most overbearing character in *The Power* of the Dog is never seen. After all, Bronco Henry's been dead for decades. But his shadow, his legend, his mystique and brutish masculinity hangs over the Montana ranch that is the remote home to the Burbank brothers, Phil (Cumberbatch) and George (Plemons). They don't seem like siblings at all. George, who rides horses in his suit and has a car, seems at home in the dark and elegant Victorian house they share. Phil's bowlegged from all his time in the saddle, a sardonic roughrider with a penchant for cruelty. But if they weren't brothers, still sharing the same bedroom, would George acquiesce every time Phil calls him Fatso?

It's those little details that start to construct Jane Campion's powerful and tragic adaptation of Thomas Savage's 1967 novel. Superficially, it's part of the grand tradition of Western novels about battling dynasties (Savage himself wrote several books in that vein), but this isn't the Old West. This is 1925, and Phil is desperately hanging on to the dying ways through the myth of Bronco Henry, whose name elicits wide-eyed wonder from the cowboys with whom he spends his time. Meanwhile, George has bigger plans. He's what their absentee parents (Conroy as the Old Lady and Carroll as the Old Gent) wanted their boys to be, and he wants Rose (Dunst), the widow who runs the boarding house in the nearby market town. With her comes her effete, angular, awkward son, Peter (Smit-McPhee) - or, as Phil calls him, Miss Nancy.

Scarcely repressed homophobia is a rampant theme in both Savage's book and Campion's script, but the bullying that Pete endures is a fragment of all the broken pieces of Phil, a man at constant war with himself who lashes out at everyone and everything that isn't the fetishized Bronco Henry. His primary target is the fragile Rose – an easy target, considering George is away on business so much – and this is the true spark for the inevitable conflagration. Yet it's a quiet fire, like a branch charcoaling from within.

Bluntly, The Power of the Dog may end up being as widely misinterpreted as Midsommar (no, that's not a happy ending) or Phantom Thread (again, not a grand romantic victory). That will not be Campion's fault, but that of the preconceptions stirred by the looks that Phil throws the winsome Pete's way. Phil is the protagonist, antagonist, villain, and victim here, those elements all balanced in a career best (and that's saying something) performance from Cumberbatch as a desperate man incapable of processing change except through ferocious and bitter malice. Those misreadings are through his eyes, the result of all the complex levels of himself that he has rejected through all those years of literally shining Bronco Henry's empty saddle. It's a performance predicated on the difference between empathy and sympathy: The audience will increasingly, through those details at which Cumberbatch has always excelled, comprehend who exactly he is, and how his pretense of strength has been forged through submitting to the claustrophobic expanses of the plains (New Zealand standing in for Montana, and starkly captured through the lens of cinematographer Ari Wegner).

The core of the film is two conflicts: Phil with himself, and Phil with Rose. The latter is most overt, and within which it's easiest to loathe Phil. Campion and her cast do an extraordinary job of bringing all these characters in midway through their own private traumas, and Dunst brings silent grace and sadness to a woman inherently doubting her own motivations, even before Phil becomes the menacing shadow in the corner of her eye, the stinking, muck-covered presence she can smell before he enters the room. It's during these moments, abandoned by Plemons' mannered and oblivious George and deprived of the emotional support of Smit-McPhee's college-bound Pete, that she drags the audience with her as she spirals into despair, as all the while Phil malevolently grins.

But Cumberbatch is not interested in creating a cardboard villain. His grasp of tiny nuances of movement and micro-inflections overcomes any doubts about the definitionally upper-middle-class English actor as a tortured and torturing cowpoke. As in *The Imitation Game* and, most recently, in the quirky but still sad *The Electrical Life of Louis Wain*, he again plays a man betrayed by his time. Take Phil out of 1925, the story implicitly suggests, and he is not this Phil. But at any other time there is no Bronco Henry, and this tragedy would not be so darkly heartrending.

✿ GHOSTBUSTERS: AFTERLIFE

D: Jason Reitman; with Mckenna Grace, Finn Wolfhard, Carrie Coon, Paul Rudd, Logan Kim, Celeste O'Connor. (PG-13, 124 min.)

It's been 37 years since a quartet of New Yorkers saved the Big Apple (and the rest of the world) from Gozer the Gozerian, the Sumerian eater of souls. In the intervening years, the inevitable happened: They disappeared. The Ghostbusters, that is. And so it makes all the sense in the world that the second sequel movie, *Ghostbusters: Afterlife*, looks elsewhere than at whatever happened to Stantz, Venkman, Zeddmore, and Spengler.

Not that they've disappeared all together. They've left debris, in this case Egon's abandoned daughter, Callie (Coon); and her kids, nerdy Phoebe (Grace) and gangly Trevor (Wolfhard). This is the Spengler family story, but that's news to Phoebe, who knew nothing of her grandfather even though it's pretty clear that the science genes skipped a generation. So of course she's the one who's going to unearth the family business, even if it's buried in the wrecked farm in Summerville, Okla., that Egon left her mom, where the local summer school teacher (Paul Rudd, having a blast) is doubling as a seismologist. Because you don't get earthquakes in Oklahoma. Especially not the kind that whatever dear late Grandpa was investigating, the kind that leads to supernatural action-comedy fun.

At some levels, Jason Reitman is exactly the kind of director who shouldn't tackle a *Ghostbusters* movie. His films have dealt with delayed adolescence (*Young Adult*), being forced to grow up too fast (*Juno*), the generational divide (*Men, Women & Children*), and contending with career regret (*Up in the Air*). Then again,

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maybe those all make him just the right choice for *Ghostbusters: Afterlife*, since he's always approached those topics with a comedic earnestness – a trait he arguably inherited from his father, *Ghostbusters* director Ivan Reitman. Bringing in co-writer Gil Kenan to smooth away some of his more satirical edges worked, not least because Kenan has a lot of experience with kid-level weird adventures on *Monster House* and the underseen but endlessly imaginative *City of Ember*.

But it's the family side that means most, because Ghostbusters: Afterlife is a son's loving and spot-on tribute to his father's biggest film. It comes from being immersed in the lore, of thinking about the nature of ghosts in this world, of thinking about where mad magician Ivo Shandor got all that selenium for the girders for 550 Central Park West, aka Spook Central. It comes from getting that the original wasn't afraid to be funny, and heartfelt, and scary, and romantic, and nerdy, all at the same time. It comes from centering on Grace's Phoebe, who's not just a teen imitation of the late Harold Ramis' beloved braniac 'buster, but a dead cert look-alike for his daughter, Violet Ramis Stiel, when she was 12. There's history here, not Easter eggs.

Is Ghostbusters: Afterlife wish fulfillment? Absolutely. It's the dream of every kid who grew up making a proton pack out of paper towel rolls and plastic bowls. It's Reitman writing himself into the legacy that he grew up with, telling his part of the story his father started. And it's one last chance to say thank you and goodbye to the original team, and most especially to Ramis. There will be some people who think what it's doing is mawkish or even exploitative, but they should probably level those accusations at the grave-robbing antics of the deeply cynical 2016 remake. What Ghostbusters: Afterlife has, and that lacked, is heart, as well as a deep appreciation for how utterly weird and eclectic the original film was. 1984 was the year of Indiana Jones watching as a man got his heart pulled out before being dropped, screaming and alive, into a lava pit. It was the year that gremlins

threw an old lady out of a window. But even by those standards, *Ghostbusters* was a bizarre film, originally written as a hard-edged horror/ sci-fi/comedy but which transformed into a family-friendly smash, and transformed Dan Aykroyd, Bill Murray, and Harold Ramis from edgy oddballs into your quirky uncles. *Ghostbusters: Afterlife* may not change cinema in the way the original did, but it's a worthy next generation.

INDIA SWEETS AND SPICES D: Geeta Malik; with Sophia Ali, Manisha Koirala, Rish

Shah, Deepti Gupta, Adil Hussain, Ved Sapru, Anita Kalathara, Kamran Shaikh. (PG-13, 101 min.)

One can never be too careful in educating the young. A year away at college in a liberal, West Coast university, for example, can turn any impressionable mind against you like that. For Alia (Ali), returning home for the summer from UCLA to her family home nestled in the very affluent neighborhood of Ruby Hill, N.J., this is demonstrated by drinking alcohol, falling for a young man below her caste, exposing family secrets, and generally just upending the rigid status quo, emphasis on status. And while India Sweets and Spices adds a veneer of depicting the contemporary Indian American experience, beyond the gorgeous lehengas and saris, past the insert shots of perfectly arrayed cuisine, lies a bland, uninspired story cut from a well worn template.

Not to say that cultural representation isn't important, you just can't have it do all the heavy lifting. Maybe add engaging characters involved in a compelling narrative into the mix? No? All right, I guess the "if it ain't broke" model it is. Here then, is Alia, who, amidst the weekly extravagant parties thrown by the ultra rich community she grew up in, is lovestruck by Varun (Shah), the son of shopkeepers whose grocery store shares the film's title. Alia invites Varun and his parents to one of the parties, leading to the usual class conflict snobbery/embarrassment scenario. Adding another wrinkle, it seems that Alia's mom, Sheila (Koirala) and Varun's mom Bhairavi (Gupta) went to college together in Delhi and were an integral part of an activist group for women's rights, shaving their heads and getting arrested at protests. What happened, Alia wonders, to her mother, once a young idealist, now a shallow materialist under the thumb of the aunties, a circle of the wives and elders whose toxic gossip is the currency and the lifeblood that sustains this community? And more importantly, what can she do to not end up like her parents?

Sheila's reconnecting with her past ends up eclipsing the "wrong side of the suburbs" love story, as mother and daughter reconcile. It was pretty half-hearted anyway, as was another plotline. this one involving Alia's dad Ranjit (Hussain) and his numerous extramarital affairs coming to light. There is a running metaphor throughout India Sweets and Spices concerning books. In Alia's house, they're all fake, uncut props that match the carpet, whereas Varun's parents have a veritable library strewn around the house (mostly paperbacks though, they are lower middle class, after all). It's a lazy trope in a lazy film, and not even the airing of everyone's dirty laundry at the summer's end soirée comeuppance can lift this film out of its sitcom trappings. Positive ethnic portrayals are always refreshing, but unfortunately, homogenization rarely has any flavor. Josh Kupecki **

CM HILL COUNTRY GALLERIA

Context B. Weide, Don Argott. (NR, 127 min.)

This is not a documentary about Kurt Vonnegut. This is a documentary about Kurt Vonnegut.

The writer of *Breakfast of Champions* and *Slaughterhouse Five* would probably appreciate that contradiction, or a film existing in multiple spaces at once. What *Kurt Vonnegut: Unstuck in Time* really seeks to be is documentarian Robert B. Weide's somewhat-begrudging retelling of his 33-year effort to tell the story of Vonnegut. It may be the only way to realistically approach the material, since Vonnegut himself so constantly interwove autobiography and self-critique. So this isn't Weide inserting himself into the story of the great writer, but acknowledging that the observer affects the phenomenon observed.

Wisely, he shares directing credit with Don Argott, to permit for some distance. He may be a possibly surprising choice, having cut his teeth on heavy metal docs like *Last Days Here* and Lamb of God's *As the Palaces Burn*, but then Weide has spent much of the duration of making his Vonnegut documentary in a lengthy and fruitful working relationship with Larry David. Talk about polar opposites: David, who has found meanspirited comedy in everyday mundanities, and Vonnegut, who tried to find levity in grand, cosmic despair. For a man whose books are so effortlessly hilarious, his life was so filled with tragedy (far more than his nightmarish and career-illuminating experience as a prisoner-of-war in Dresden during World War II). But this isn't about the books. This is about the man, and Weide and Argott construct his life from an extensive archive of home movies, photographs, and assorted recordings, but also from those close to him, most especially his family. The books are there as a way to understand Vonnegut, rather than turning him in to a doorway into the literature.


But even then they are peripheral to Vonnegut the man. This is Vonnegut as jobbing writer, failed car salesman, unlikely pop culture icon, best-selling novelist, has-been, resurgent institution, sibling, deceased, fictionalized version of himself through his alter-ego, Kilgore Trout. These simultaneous aspects are depicted here as seen by the people closest to him: his daughters, his friends, the four nephews he took in when his sister died. Plus, of course, Weide himself, through their friendship, the filmmaker's script for the 1996 adaptation of Mother Night, his own inability to get Unstuck in Time made (in spite of the cajoling and support for the writer himself), and his own intrusion into the work of Vonnegut. That's where Kurt Vonnegut: Unstuck in Time is most fascinating, in its exploration of the blurred lines between what who writers (and filmmakers) are, and what they write, and why they write. - Richard Whittaker *** BLUE STARLITE MUELLER II

🗢 SHE PARADISE

D: Maya Cozier; with Onessa Nestor, Kern Mollineau, Michael Cherrie, Kimberly Crichton, Denisia Latchman, Chelsey Rampersad. (NR, 71 min.)

She Paradise is not what one would think of as a clear-cut dance film, though it does follow a young girl's evolution as a soca dancer in Trinidad. It's more bittersweet than fun, as our main character learns hard truths about how the world sees her, consequently gaining a stronger sense of self. Adapted from a 2019 short by Trinidad-born Maya Cozier, a former dancer herself, and co-written by Melina Brown, *She Paradise* transcends the classic coming-of-age storyline, resulting in something understated and powerful.

Sparkle (Nestor) is a 17-year-old living with her out-of-work goldsmith grandpa, so strapped for cash that she picks peppers off the ground for dinner. Happening upon a group of soca dancers breaking it down in the street, she sees a moneymaking opportunity, but also a dazzling example of who she might want to be. At Sparkle's first audition for the lucrative Carnival season, she sticks out painfully, an awkward bony child wearing "12-year-old clothes" in a room full of sexually liberated women. Through the guidance of domineering ringleader Diamond (Crichton) and softer, friendlier Mica (Rampersad), Sparkle quickly finds her footing and even becomes something of a wunderkind star of the group. As Sparkle climbs upward in the soca scene. clashing with her grandpa over the brazen sexuality of the dance and its fashion, landing



the troupe a music video with her unwitting seduction of sleazy producer Skinny (Mollineau). it becomes more doubtful whether these girls are her friends, role models, parental figures, or enemies. As she escapes her grandpa's shadow, she steps into Diamond's, the quasimother of the group who is particularly harsh on her. Whether it's because she sees a younger version of herself in Sparkle and wants to prepare her for the worst or because she's jealous of the mounting attention Sparkle is getting despite her inexperience is unclear. Mica is Sparkle's closest ally, but in key moments of need even she proves unreliable and cold. Sparkle is still painfully naive – her glowing reaction to what we assume is the first male attention she has received from the predatory Skinny immediately evokes gueasiness - but as the film goes on and she realizes she's alone in this world, she begins to summon surprising conviction and power.

It's a quiet film, focusing on Sparkle's interior emotions, except in scenes where energetic movement and neon outfits enliven the frame. Nestor's ever-so-subtle expressions ground us so firmly in Sparkle's point of view that, despite her shyness, we feel exactly what it's like to be succeeding but out of your depth, caught up in a group of older, cooler friends that at once accept and alienate you. Anyone who has been a teenage girl will empathize deeply. Never bordering on cheesy, *She Paradise* is a heartfelt ode to the strength it takes to learn to stand up for yourself in a painful world.



Music **Aftereffects of Astroworld**

An interesting byproduct of tragedies is the semantic shift that ensues. The name "Astroworld" once conjured memories of a bygone Texas amusement park. Then, in 2018, when Travis Scott released his landmark album and subsequent music festival, the word - at least for a young demographic - became identifiable with the Houston rapper's high-energy art. Now and forever, Astroworld is synonymous with a concert devolving into deadly chaos.

A hellish scene of ongoing crowd surges at the festival's opening night on November 5 left 10 attendees dead and hundreds injured, including a 9-year-FASTER old who died last Sunday follow-

ing a medically induced coma. A similar change in connotation probably occurred with the word "altamont": first meaning "high mountain," then, after the infamous 1969 free concert at California's Altamont racetrack

where four attendees died, including a young man stabbed by Hells Angels security, the word became representative of death - perhaps even the death of a generation.

One thing's certain: the way large concerts are operated is now being scrutinized in the wake of Astroworld. Among the elements being called into question: crowd configuration, ground conditions, the concert not being halted for obvious mass injury, security staffing, and even the energy that an artist's music can provoke.

Here in the seat of state government, a task force is being assembled - headed by Texas Music Office Director Brendon Anthony and including safety experts, police and fire representatives, state agencies including Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, and unspecified music industry leaders. Ultimately, they'll "produce a report of recommendations and strategies to ensure concert safety and protect concertgoers."

Anthony declined to comment before the task force's first meeting, planned for sometime this week.

Meanwhile, Houston law enforcement and various attorneys are dissecting the disaster. Multiple lawsuits have been filed against Scott, also naming Live Nation Entertainment and its Austin-based subsidiary ScoreMore Shows.

ScoreMore's logo is prominently displayed on the "Event Operation Plan" for Astroworld,

which CNN obtained. The 56-page document has drawn criticism for instructing staff to refer to dead concertgoers as "smurfs" on radio, but what's gotten even more attention is a lack of specific protocols related to crowd surges though it does discuss crowd management in relation to preventing a "civil disturbance/riot."

That may not be abnormal. Several concert promotions executives with experience staging large-scale events in Austin tell the Chronicle they don't recall crowd surges being explicitly addressed in operation plans. Separately, one representative for a major local music

organization revealed their staff trains for crowd surges before

every large event. ScoreMore's plan lists only two positions with authority to stop the show: executive producer and festival director - both names redacted. While there's an argument that stopping a concert risks inciting civil

disturbance, those with the power to pull the plug at Astroworld didn't do so when it became a mass casualty event.

ScoreMore declined to comment, providing a joint statement with Live Nation saying the companies "remain focused on working with local authorities to support their investigation in the search for answers."

In 2009, Sascha Guttfreund and Claire Bogle founded ScoreMore as Austin-based college students. Hip-hop shows at fraternities grew into major bookings at the Parish and Emo's, and within 10 years of its establishment, ScoreMore grew into Texas' largest independent promotions company. In a 2014 Chronicle interview, Guttfreund described his taste-making methodology.

"I surrounded myself with other 18 and 22-year-old music fans, and we all voted on what acts to book."

The co-founders hosted hallmarks of 2010s hip-hop like J. Cole, Kendrick Lamar, and Wiz Khalifa's first Texas shows under the slogan, "Your favorite rapper's favorite promoter."

Early on, the boutique agency used a network of fellow college students to sell paper tickets to shows. The promoters were compensated through internship credits, admission to shows, or cash commissions. Multiple former employees who spoke with the Chronicle said the company ran on their popularity or "social capital" to attract free workers.



"I don't think anyone was getting paid, or paid very well," said one former intern/contract worker who spoke anonymously. "They would make these kids hustle. There was very much a sense of 'you've got to do this if you want to get in the music industry.' A lot of those kids wanted to be artists or managers, and they were hungry."

The employee says ScoreMore relied heavily on unpaid roles that extended beyond single semesters, many of which were filled by young women: "I do feel like they were a company that exploited me, and paid me as little as they possibly could when appropriate. I'm not surprised that those people will cut corners for cost.

"They were also really willing to not do things by the book, like Claire and Sascha were dating. It was very close-knit, like family. But also, people [on the team were] in relationships, and not working normal hours going to these shows."

A report in Rolling Stone last week saw former ScoreMore employees accusing the company of "disorganization, cost-cutting, and unprofessionalism." In it, Guttfreund's former assistant, David Tran, alleges his boss punched him in the face for pocketing unaccounted box office cash.

Etienne Maurice tells the Chronicle he was ScoreMore's first videographer, joining the company informally during its founding years while he studied at Huston-Tillotson University. He says the company formed a network of tour stops in Austin, Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio with "literally perfect timing" regarding the decade's wave of breakout hip-hop.

"ScoreMore gave me my first platform as a filmmaker, getting a behind-the-scenes look at musical legends before they popped off," says Maurice. "Claire and Sascha really built something special. Were people taken advantage of in that process? Hell yeah. I was paid very little, but I was a freshman in college. So, \$100 to shoot and edit freaking Big Sean on his first tour? I was like, 'Hell yeah.'"

The promoters grew in stature with the legendary after-hours South by Southwest event

Illmore, a collaboration between ScoreMore and hip-hop site **IllRoots**. Founded in 2011 as a private house party, the annual shows evolved to host performers like Lil Wayne, Diplo, and Chance the Rapper until its final year in 2016.

"We rented out this big house, and every single artist you could think of came through," remembers Maurice of Illmore's roots. "It was straight out of a movie, but they were all just chilling. That was the love ScoreMore got - it wasn't flashy or Hollywood. ScoreMore was a reminder of what it felt like to be regular kids in college, listening to music and enjoying the scene."

In May 2018, ScoreMore sold a majority stake to industry giants Live Nation. At the time, it was reported that they kept their staff and continued to operate out of their Austin office. The agreement did not cede control of ScoreMore's artist management assets. Guttfreund managed Canadian rapper Torv Lanez and Bogle previously represented Colombian American singer Kali Uchis.


Bogle went on to become a partner with EQT Management. Her current involvement with ScoreMore is unclear.

Live Nation was no doubt attracted by ScoreMore's growing calendar of annual festivals, including San Antonio's Mala Luna and the multicity JMBLYA, which has hosted Travis Scott in multiple years. In 2017, the Chronicle reported the parking lot fest ran out of water mid-event in Austin.

Of ScoreMore's annual roster, the only festival with a confirmed upcoming date is J. Cole's Dreamville in North Carolina. Presale tickets for the April event already sold out with no lineup announced.

ScoreMore's only Austin festival, JMBLYA, has not taken place since 2019 due to pandemic cancellations. Prior, the Austin stop typically took place in May at Circuit of the Americas.

Representatives from the venue didn't respond to a Chronicle inquiry of whether JMBLYA would be at COTA this year and if Astroworld's disastrous outcome impacted their relationship with the event. The JMBLYA website says, "See you in 2022."

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The Best a Band Can Get: The Story of Pussy Gillette

A scene veteran and a bass beginner coin the best band name in Austin – and the music's good, too

Masani Negloria tightens her cape. Nathan Calhoun lights a cigarette.

"You suckas better hold your breath, 'Cause we're Pussy Gillette, and this gun's for hire!"

With a snappy snare, Austin's best-named band comes to life.

A leather-clad Negloria – or Blackula, as she's known tonight – fingerpicks a fuzzy bass line and Calhoun, in a skeleton suit, scratches out power chords next to her. Drummer Brent Prager, in a banana suit, supplies the concussive beat.

It's Halloween and Swedish rockers the Hives are about to close out the final night of the Levitation festival. Before the Aughts garage sensations can grace the Mohawk stage, Austin punks Pussy Gillette are here to prime the crowd.

Calhoun keeps it cool – shades on, lips pursed to keep his cigarette steady. Prager pounds away, bangs in his face. Negloria, however, chats up the audience after every song, a bravado in her voice akin to that of a rockstar entertaining a stadium. Little does the club crowd know, this is her first project.

"I didn't know I could do any of this until I actually did it," the singer, 36, says over coffee at Cherrywood, weeks before the gig. "I just had a bass that I would kind of stare at, but I didn't really stick to it."

One day, on a whim, her longtime friend Calhoun – a veteran of Austin's underground whose past projects include Chaindrive and Gibby Haynes & His Problem and currently plays bass in heavy psych melters We Are the Asteroid – invited her to jam. The duo wrote their first song that night.

"I Don't Wanna Be Right," the product of that spur-of-the-moment writing session, appears on Pussy Gillette's eponymous debut album, out November 19. At less than 90 seconds, the amelodic track elephant stomps out the LP, Negloria's yelps piercing through Calhoun's guitar howl. "I got better things to do than sit and lie in bed with you." the bassist sneers.

The band's core pair still emphasize spontaneity when it comes to writing and recording. They put their sprawling, 19-song LP to tape over just three days last March.

"I've been in projects where we labor over things for a really long time and I don't know if they ever come out any better than they do just making it up really quick," Calhoun reasons over a cigarette.

Originally from Pennsylvania, the guitarist began playing in bands as a teenager and moved to Austin in 1990 – drawn by the promise of cheap rent. He met Prager, who also plays bass in deviant punk institution Fuckemos, back then, when Prager was drumming for noise legends Cherubs the first time around. In true punk rock fashion, Calhoun recorded the Pussy Gillette album himself, to a four-track cassette.

Dominated by mid-tempo barn burners, *Pussy Gillette* specializes in mostly fun, slightly nasty garage rock, the kind that bursts in and out in under three minutes. Opener "2 to 10" is all distortion, while the wailing riff in "Surf City" drives home the track's seaside theme.

Latest sludgy single "Banana" sums up the band's humor well: "I got a problem with you stealing my banana/ And when I find you I will show you the hammer," Negloria threatens. Surely there's a double entendre in there somewhere. Soon enough, however, you wonder if the absurdity is literal: "I got a crunchy lettuce wrap at home/ Just let me eat my banana alone." In the music video, Calhoun and Prager don banana suits while Negloria meanmugs in a purple bikini, wielding a sledgehammer. A fire rages behind them. In keeping with the trio's analog aesthetic, they shot the visual on VHS.

Jokes aside, Pussy Gillette can also veer political. "Mala Noche," which Negloria sings in Spanish, "is just about, you know," the singer pauses, choosing her words carefully. "It's a little darker of a song. I guess it denounces Christ."

"Wow," Calhoun says, laughing. "I just thought it sounded cool."

The growling track comes second only to "Walking Crime" in terms of bite. Where one decries heavenly bodies, the latter rejects secular authority. A condemnation of police overreach, the singer's description of dehumanization cuts through the sonic grime. "They'll find a way to make you feel you're better off dead," she spits over a back-and-forth riff. As the bass rumbles, it all hinges on one line: "You see me as a walking crime, but you're just a pig to me!"

Pussy Gillette released "Walking Crime" as a single in May 2020 in the wake of George Floyd's murder by Minneapolis police officer Derek Chauvin, but Calhoun and Negloria emphasize that the song – inspired by the bassist's own experience with losing a friend to police violence – had been written before the summer's surge in protests.

"You see me as a walking crime, but you're just a pig to me!" Pussy Gillette's bassist/vocalist Masani Negloria sings on the track "Walking Crime."

"I've experienced racism my entire life," Negloria says. "So the fact that it's so new to some people, or some people are finally opening their eyes about it, is an interesting thing."

It's clear Negloria would rather let her lyrics speak for themselves than dive deep into her thoughts and experiences with racism. She states the obvious - things need to change – but her muted demeanor conveys an exhaustion recognizable to all Black people.

Calhoun sits quietly as his bandmate discusses the song and its context. But as the conversation broadens, and we discuss diversity in the local music scene, he offers his own perspective.

The guitarist thinks back to the Austin he first encountered in the Nineties, soon after the Dicks and the Big Boys - "bands fronted by gay men and communists," he underlines - made their names.

"There was a strong lesbian scene, people of color were always in bands," Calhoun says. "That's always been a hallmark of Austin. Mixed race, mixed sexes, mixed sexual preferences. They're really prevalent here. And I think a lot of that was lost maybe in the last 20 years."

Suddenly acutely aware of his monologue, Calhoun pauses. "Did I interrupt and take over with my privileged speak?" he asks. "Sorry."

Despite his persistent apologies, Negloria simply laughs. Perhaps she's used to Calhoun's speeches - perhaps she just didn't have anything else to say.

This is Pussy Gillette's core dynamic summarized: while the two come from starkly different backgrounds, musically and otherwise, they exhibit a tight bond and a clear understanding of each other. Negloria is succinct, Calhoun speaks in paragraphs. Calhoun cracks jokes, and Negloria laughs heartily.

This unspoken intelligence informs the duo's writing. Calhoun describes Negloria as the band's driving song force, whose basslines serve as the creative scaffolding of their songs, and himself as PG's nitpicky museum curator, who offers constructive criticism along the way.

"And we don't get mad at each other, which is pretty good," he says happily.


Despite their differences – "Masani likes PROG," Calhoun exclaims - they've been able to avoid band drama, which the music veteran sighs is a "whole 'nother iob."

With their first LP in the can, what's next for Pussy Gillette? Tour?

"I was thinking about writing this thing about a deaf, dumb, and blind kid that plays pinball," Calhoun offers.

Negloria cackles. "You could do a whole movie about that."

At least they have a plan.

ALEJANDRO ESCOVEDO

La Cruzada (Yep Roc)

Recorded in Italy with native backers Don Antonio, 2018's The Crossing bridges back to the immigrant soul of Aleiandro Escovedo's 2002 audio play By the Hand of the Father.

Folkloric to punk, classically rock, idealistic and disillusioned, "The Crossing proves another way forward for our one-man Johnny Thunders, Joev Ramone, and Neal Cassady," opined the

Chronicle. Noirish ("Footsteps in the Shadows"), rootsy ("Texas Is My Mother"), sneering ("Teenage Luggage"), Stonesy ("Something Blue"), hookish ("Outlaw for You"), balladic ("Silver City"), modern ("MC Overload"), Escovedo's tale of two Latin teens meeting in Galveston sprawls an hourlong travelogue through a pop culture nirvana turned xenophobic dystopia.

Originally sold-out on Record Store Day 2020 and charting in Mexico, its iteration en español received widespread re-release this August. Translated by Escovdeo and principal singer Alex Ruiz of Del Castillo, La Cruzada further populates crucial vocal support from Austin castanets queen Patricia Vonne and San Antonio's Vanessa Del Fierro. Don Antonio Gramentieri lends Italian and the maestro English on melting duet "Volador."

For his part, Ruiz lends prowling drama to a hungry storyline. The frontman's rich Spanish vowelry dominates the stripped back, Lone Star ambience of "Tejas Es Mi Madre," "Cuantas Veces," y "Lluvia de Flor de Cerezo," One misses Escovedo's overripe croon and derision. yet when he and Ruiz share a mic on "Bandido Para Ti," a Marfa lights moment flashes across the entirety of The Crossing/La Cruzada. ****

NOLAN POTTER'S NIGHTMARE BAND

Music Is Dead (Castle Face Records)

Synth-drenched symphonic power ballad "One Eye Flees Aquapolis" pours rose petals on the path that traverses the soundscape of Nolan Potter's third eye. This recent source of distortion soul food, bearing the Nietzsche-esque title Music Is Dead, counts as the NP's third release of 2021 - following perfunctory Bandcamp offerings Eggbound and Nolan's Quarantine Quovers Quollection. More of a followup to 2019 breakout Nightmare Forever, this six-track full-band effort thrusts easy listening upon the mass-

es, like riding a shooting star through outer space.

Taking a sip from a shoegaze medley laced with Ty Segall and King Gizzard & the Lizard Wizard, the Michigan-raised composer drips 41 minutes of straight glorious meta analysis on the current state of music production through the postmodern lens of his commodified discography. Soaked with soul and cynicism, this neo-psychedelia induced existentialism implores a deeper look at the creative process in a capitalist era and oversaturated music scene atop a backdrop of feral guitar riffs and airy flute accompaniments.

The fear of selling out courses deep in this magnum exploration oozing ecstatic downbeats that flow horror show through songs "Stubborn Bubble" and "Preeminent Minds." The extended tracks score astral projections with interludes harkening back to woodwind wonderlands and science-fiction sagas in "Gregorian Chance." Rubbernecking kills but break your gaze for this tracedent glimpse into the tranquil spiral of a modern virtuoso clad in denim. **** Mars Salazar

SWALLOW THE SUN

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Take the progressive melodicism of genre forebears like the Moody Blues. a deep vein of gothic emotion à la Jov Division, and crossbreed both with the Finnish metallurgy birthing extremists such as Unholy, Unkind, Abhorrence, Hooded Menace, Oranssi Pazuzu, Rotten Sound, and Reverend Bizarre. and behold Western Finland doom/ death journeymen Swallow the Sun.

"Life is usually miserable," emails singer Mikko Kotamäki, addressing his homeland's anger management issues. "That's where the lyrics come from. Finnish mentality is not very often positive. It's better to put your frustration and anger into music. It's very therapeutic."

In 2010, downstairs at the old Emo's, Swallow the Sun opened the Finnish Metal tour, headlined by pagan thrashers Finntroll and mid-slotted by blackened Helsinki folkers Moonsorrow, Raging like a polar storm, all three groups immolated the corner of Sixth and Red River that night, white walkers taking up instruments to shriek the millennia. Almost two decades in now, and returning locally with eighth LP. Moonflowers, Kotamäki retains all.

"I remember that day very well," affirms the frontman. "I loved old Emo's. There was also that great hot sauce shop next door. Our friend took us to a shooting range before soundcheck and then we went to Stubb's for some all-you-can-eat BBQ. - Raoul Hernandez

"Good times. I believe it was our first time in Austin."

BENNY THE BUTCHER Empire Garage, Friday 19

Benny the Butcher's larger-than-life raps sometimes feel unreal due to the vividness with which he portrays his transition from the dope game to nationwide touring. The member of Buffalo, N.Y., collective Griselda, along with cousins Conway the Machine and Westside Gunn, continues to outlast obstacles such as falling victim to a botched robbery last November. This November brought better fortunes - his first solo major label deal. Snoop Dogg personally signed the Butcher to Def Jam as part of his new creative consultant role at the UMG outfit. DEEP CROSS. MORE EAZE Swan Dive, Friday 19

An entrée to Austin's experimental electronic realm, duo Deep Cross unhurriedly traverse darkwave-tinged industrial while trading off a black metallic vocal fry and sullen incantation all with a through line of existential dread. DJ Erika Voight spins dark ambient and dub techno under the Private Service alias, and the prolific More Eaze provides a hyperlocal abstract glance at the revived field recording scene. Openers JT Whitfield and Shane English combine their post-industrial prowess into a rescheduled debut performance from the conceptual Closed City, whose vinyl bow dropped in June 2020. - Greg Stitt

SPACEFLIGHT RECORDS AT EAST **Central Machine Works, Saturday 20**

As the East Austin Studio Tour showcases the best art right of I-35, Spaceflight Records docks at this East Cesar Chavez beer hall. The Austin indie label's party kicks off at 3pm with Wil Cope & the Dope blasting off planetary country before a set from transcendent pop-rock quartet Slomo Drags. Croy & the Boys speak worldly truths through honky tonk tunes and Think No Think shreds epic, noisy riffs. Primo the Alien adds a final shimmering touch with her synth-pop sound - the perfect multigenre round-trip. - Morgan-Taylor Thomas

EVERY TIME I DIE Empire Garage, Saturday 20/Sunday 21

Spawned from the frigid hellscape of Buffalo to combat the falsehood that listening to metal for lyrics is rock music's "reading Playboy for articles," Every Time I Die have spent two decades positioning their livewire riffs to explode upon instant contact with rampaging singer Keith Buckley - mathcore's poet laureate of alcoholic self-loathing. Thankfully, whether the dude's copping a stoner-rock croon or howling about turning 42 (the November 19 date shall be ... a birthday ... bonanza), Buckley maintains remarkable intelligibility without sacrificing a thimble of frenetic energy. 2021's Radical, a Trumpdamaged masterpiece of an LP9, foregrounds the singer's most gleefully self-destructive, despairingly nihilistic words to date - imbuing each pit-ready breakdown with palpable catharsis and urgency. Don't wear your earbuds too tight. '68 and Candy open both nights. - Julian Towers

BUCK MEEK **3ten ACL Live, Monday 22**

It's an overdue return home - or close to it. Wimberley native and Big Thief guitarist Buck Meek swings through this time around as a solo act and with his second solo album. Two Saviors, which came out in January, was originally set for a July 2020 release, but the pandemic delayed the album and subsequent tour. Now Meek's on the road toting a new suitcase of character-driven songs with a decidedly Texas twang to them, complete with steel and acoustic picking. Los Angeles experimental pop group Kidi Band joins Meek with hand claps and whiz-bangs




