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



THE TALE OF ANTS

CLEAR, CONCISE AND BARE FACTS

Want to Correct "Learning Loss" in Texas Schools? Listen to Texas Students.

Over the past 18 months, all students experienced schooling disruptions. State leaders in Texas must address "learning loss" and to do so they need to empower student voices.

TEA Commissioner Mike Morath recently called "learning loss" the "largest problem facing the state of Texas." 2020-21 STAAR scores indicate students have fallen behind in both mathematics and reading. In math, students have fallen back to percentages not seen since 2012.

House Bill 4545, passed this past summer, requires districts to provide 30 hours of intervention tutoring for any student who failed, or did not take, the STAAR in each tested subject. This leaves school districts with virtually no choice but to extend their school day and/ or year and use their ESSER funds to meet these demands.

The solutions offered up by Texas leaders focus heavily on instruction and increasing the amount of time children spend in school. However, leaders are assuming that all Texas schools are safe spaces that are conducive to student learning, which is not always the case. Students need to feel a sense of belonging at school. They need to be known, seen, heard, and valued. Research shows that until these basic needs are met, no amount of mandated tutoring or intervention will be effective.

Texas can learn from the work occurring in other states. When discussing how to best reopen schools in Chicago, the superintendent held forums with the Student Voice Committees established at secondary schools across the city. Students easily identified solutions to some of the struggles they were experiencing due to the pandemic. Some of these solutions included reducing student workloads, hiring additional school counselors, and adopting a more culturally responsive curriculum.

The superintendent of the Ferguson-Florissant School District, outside St. Louis, also sought student input when deciding how to best reopen school doors through listening sessions with middle and high school students. Students said they wanted to see more of themselves in the curricula and wished to connect more with their teachers. Students there are now helping to design and lead school reopening orientations and drafting districtwide anti-racist standards.

High school students in Kentucky teamed up with researchers at the University of Kentucky to survey almost 9,500 students across the state. They

found that a majority of students (84%) reported taking on additional responsibilities since the pandemic, including working and taking care of family members. They recommended schools be more flexible about attendance policies

and expand mental health resources and opportunities for online college and career counseling. The students took their data and policy recommendations to the Kentucky State Board of Education in August 2020 causing districts to delay and amend their reopening plans.


Effective teachers are those who enable students to be producers of their learning, rather than consumers, by empowering their voices and listening to their ideas. This happens daily in classrooms across the state of Texas. If effective teachers are doing this, shouldn't effective leaders do the same?

To improve students' experience in school and their capacity to learn, student voices need to be amplified. Their views need to be leading the way in informing school policy and practice. Rather than pushing a longer school day/year and requiring intensive interventions, Texas leaders should be encouraging school leaders to listen to student perspectives and use ESSER funds to implement their ideas.

As we get back to the normalcy of schools and classrooms and work to fill the gaps in state-mandated standards, it is important to remember schooling is fundamentally for and about students. Students know their own learning experience best. Now is the time for Texas leaders to step back and listen to them.

Your Servants Are Listening

Angry readers, busted City Hall aides, triumphant politicians: The system works!

Like many journalists in today's media ecosystem, I find myself wondering exactly who I'm talking to. We have access to many more people in more places than we

did before the internet. But we have less of a sense of what they really think or care about than we did when we mostly picked our audiences, writing to targets whose geography and status matched our own, in a world where the number of news outlets was sternly finite. Now that every-

one is competing with *The New York Times* (who does not play fair with small local outlets; pass it on), that audience gerrymandering is becoming unwound, and doing a job like mine (metro columnist and



news editor in a major U.S. city) is more like being a Guild navigator in the *Dune* universe, aiming at a target that exists only in our imaginations. Twitter and

other social platforms have sorta closed the breach in terms of two-way contact with audiences, but anyone who forgets never to read the comments (even the relative few we get on our stories online) can tell you that it's not the same as true honest and respectful engagement.

LIE AT YOUR OWN RISK!

Another factor that's made this all fuzzy is the obligation most political and government players, including several people running for office in Austin right now, have taken on to themselves engage with the public. This means that instead of journalists telling you why things are the way they are, we're often reporting on what other people are saying about the way things are, which is different. In the romantic and mythic version of our work, the press stands as a snarling watchdog in constant opposition to those people with power, but really, most readers just want to know the truth. Sometimes that's exactly what the official sources are delivering, sometimes it's the opposite of that. If we, as journalists, know the difference, we should say so and not just let our sources duel clumsily with each other until everyone gets tired.

BASTROP COUNTY FIRE A prescribed burn in **Bastrop State Park** on Tuesday turned into a wildfire that forced evacuations and road closures. At press time, the fire has burned close to **783** acres.

BURN BAN ISSUED Due to low humidity levels and strong winds accompanying this week's cold front, Travis County has issued a **burn ban** until Feb. 16.

BALLOT APPLICATIONS TURNED AWAY Texans applying to **vote by mail** are seeing their requests denied in record numbers due to new restrictions set by Senate Bill 1, the **voter suppression law** Republican lawmakers passed last session.

NEW LAWS IN EFFECT On Tuesday, a mixed bag of new laws went into effect; they include HB 25, which seeks to limit **trans student-athlete** participation; SB 5, which restricts the use of **chains on dogs outside**; and three bills that introduced **redistricting maps** that incited a flurry of lawsuits, including from the U.S. Department of Justice.

THEIR HOUSE, THEIR RULES On Jan. 13, Austin-Travis County issued "Protecting Customers and Employees and Preserving Adequate Workforce Capacity" orders authorizing businesses to impose health and safety requirements for staff and employees, including requiring masks, testing, or vaccinations; per the order, those requirements must be posted via signage at each entry.

Every home in the U.S. is eligible to receive four free at-home COVID-19 tests from the government; order your free tests at covidtests.gov.

A.G. COURTS ANOTHER LAWSUIT Following complaints from the Austin American-Statesman, Dallas Morning News, Fort Worth-Star Telegram, Houston Chronicle, and San Antonio Express-News accusing Attorney General Ken Paxton of failing to comply with the Texas Public Information Act, the Travis County District Attorney's Office gave the A.G. four days to turn over the records in question – communications he made during the 2021 Trump rally that ended in the storming of the U.S. Capitol.

AUSTIN CITY COUNCIL DISTRICT 4 UNEXPIRED TERM We Endorse: José "Chito" Vela and Monica Guzmán

Vela is the clear front-runner in this seven-way District 4 special election - he's the strongest all-around candidate, has an appropriately diverse professional and volunteer background, distinguished himself both as a city planning commissioner and as a 2018 candidate for Texas House, and would align most often on most issues with the votes taken by outgoing Council Member Greg Casar, who has endorsed him and who we've endorsed three times for Council. (Stay tuned for our primary endorsements next month to see if Casar maintains the streak in his run for Congress.) Vela. an immigration and criminal defense attorney with his own practice, also has the strongest campaign backing to date in terms of fundraising and endorsements and might potentially win this race without a run-off, which is unlikely for any of the other six.

And yet, we also want to be (and want readers to be) mindful of what's at stake for the actual residents of this landlocked. low-turnout, largely lower-income, majority-Latino district dominated by renters and apartments. (The district changes some in the recent Council redistricting, but this

special is being held with the old 2014 lines.) Vela's interests, politics, and issues appear to be a good fit for D4, but Guzmán has spent more than a decade as a hardworking everyday advocate for people in D4 who will need one on Council even more than they do now, and her skills and track record are sufficient to earn her our rare dual-endorsement nod here.

Of the other five candidates. Melinda Schiera impressed us the most with how she's taken what she's learned as a neighborhood leader with a focus, like Guzmán. on improving community engagement, and processed it into a rationale for office: we also appreciate her level of commitment to making sure Project Connect brings the right kind of opportunities to her North Austin community. Jade Lovera's campaign isn't as insightful but nor is she wasting D4's time; the same can't quite be said of single-issue anti-homelessness campaigner Amanda Rios, who wants to be the Save Austin Now-approved candidate in a race that shows no sign of either needing or wanting one, and in which SAN itself has vet to get involved. Isa Boonto and Ramesses II Setepenre round out the field.

VOTING BY MAIL ANSWERS TO YOUR VBM OUESTIONS

Q: What if I haven't received my ballot?

A: In trying to follow new state requirements regarding voter ID, the Travis County Clerk says that they've rejected about half of the mail-in ballot applications that they've received. So if you haven't gotten yours: Visit votetravis.com, scroll to the bottom of the page, and choose the "BBM Status" button.

O: I've received my ballot and filled it out. What's the deadline for turning it in?

A: Ballots must be postmarked by election day. Jan. 25. and received by Jan. 26. or else hand-delivered to the County Clerk's Office on election day.

Q: If I apply for a ballot, can I still vote in person if I so decide? If so, what steps do I need to take? A: Yes. If you already received a ballot, you may bring it to an early voting polling location to surrender it to an early voting clerk. You'll sign a form requesting cancellation of the ballot by mail and then vote normally at the polls. If you don't bring the mail ballot, you'll have to sign an affidavit saving you didn't mark and mail in the ballot; you'll then vote provisionally.

Q: How do I vote if I don't receive my ballot in time? A: You'll need to go to a polling location and fill out an affidavit (see above).

I tried to do that with my series on the South Central Waterfront over the last three weeks, which riled up some old-time readers who've written letters to accuse me of egocentric ad hominem fact-free attacks on local saints because I 1) thought what they were telling you was wrong, and brought the receipts, and 2) did not accompany each of my points with a corresponding dunk on the other side for "balance," and 3a) expressed my personal views on a subject I know a great deal about and care about very much, a level of expertise that's frankly discouraged by most press outlets, in 3b) this here opinion column, which is different from our news coverage, which you can tell because it's written in first person and I expose myself to all the incoming flak. I think all of those things make me more credible; our letters from readers suggest otherwise. But that's OK, because it's real engagement between all the people involved in making these decisions, or trying to influence them. It's how we uncover the truth.

THAT'LL BE \$20,000, PLEASE

I also know a lot about the circumstances of the case that has led to former mayoral aide and nonprofit executive Frank Rodriguez being convicted of fraud and looking at five years or so in federal prison (he's 71). I know Frank personally, I knew about his curious dual role as City Hall advisor and leader of Latino HealthCare Forum – a group that received lots of grant funding from the city, Central Health (my consulting client at the time), and others investing in improved health outcomes in the Eastern Crescent. What did LHCF (usually just called "Latino" by those on the inside) do for those grants? Things like boosting Affordable Care Act enrollment, staging community health fairs, partnering with Univision, recruiting and training promotoras, and other efforts that mostly also fall under the broad umbrella of "civic engagement."

I also knew that Rodriguez had, at different points in his career, taken compensation from Latino for both his general services and for specific grant writing efforts; paying a commission or fee to grant writers is not unheard of. So the prospect of his doing the same while also working in the mayor's office, for pay, and bound by a code of ethics that frowns on side work, was always there, but Frank Rodriguez had a stellar reputation among the circles that also include Steve Adler, and nobody thought he would lie, to the mayor as well as to the public and the Feds, about his double-dipping. He did, and it's sad.

WEAR A PUSSYHAT WITH PRIDE

Another one of my longtime friends made good, state Sen. Sarah Eckhardt, just prevailed in the long-running bizarro First Amendment case brought by the GOP to harass her for almost five years. When she wore a knit pink "pussyhat" on the dais in 2017, following her participation in the Women's March (civic engagement!) and while she was still Travis County judge, she prompted a move to censure her by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct. (Though county judges are administrators, they can also do many "real judge" functions like marry people.) This got added onto when she told a tasteless joke about Gov. Greg Abbott at the Texas Tribune Festival in 2019, which I wrote about at the time. When she challenged her censure, the panel that finally got around to hearing her COVID-delayed case featured crotchety old white GOP judges from places like Amarillo ... who agreed unanimously that Eckhardt was acting within her constitutional rights and entitled to her opinions - or, you might say, is free to tell the truth.

Putting the Trust in Cultural Trust

New initiative to get a hold on arts and music venues

A city-funded initiative to "acquire/secure cultural arts and music venues" – either by aiding existing operators "that are at risk of displacement due to economic constraints," or by "acquisition or construction of new creative facilities space" – is about ready to spring into action, after a good long incubation period.

The city wheels do move slowly: City Council created the **Austin Economic Development Corporation** via a **Kathie Tovo** resolution back in May 2020, "with specific plans due by June

11," Rachel Rascoe noted in her column at the time ("Faster Than Sound: Could Austin Arts & Music Finally Get a Cultural Trust?" Music, May 29, 2020). And already at that point, "Tovo said city staff have already been instructed to plan a cultural trust and EDC on multiple occasions. ... 'Really, the intent of my putting [an EDC] in my resolution was to set some deadlines,' said Tovo. 'We have now directed the manager twice to create an EDC.'"

You can bet that lit a fire under someone at City Hall, because here we are, not even two years later (Council may have forgotten to specify which June), and the AEDC is a real thing, which has hired an employee and has indeed set up a Cultural Trust funded with \$16.9 million in city money - \$12 million from the 2018 bond package, coming from hotel occupancy tax and the General Fund - and is looking for places to spend it. A request for proposals is now open, accepting "proposals from qualifying respondents, organizations and operators of arts programming" to, as noted above, either preserve existing cultural or music venues, or buy or build new ones, which would be managed by the AEDC "for

the preservation and expansion [of] the cultural and music ecology of Austin."

It's an ambitious and much-needed effort, to be sure, and it's had a number of good people behind it throughout its long journey

to fruition. Of course, \$16.9 million isn't a huge amount of money spread across the Austin real estate market, and there are an awful lot of music clubs and arts organizations who've been feeling the pinch just as much as residential renters have. So the AEDC is going to have to be very

judicious in their investments, and very aggressive in their further fundraising. Best of luck to them. For more about the fund, and to reply to the RFP, see austinedc.org/ cultural-trust. And for a deeper dive...

A new study funded by the **Greater** Austin Crime Commission, an outside private support group for local law enforcement agencies, finds that if the Austin Police Department wants to maintain an average response time of 6¹/₂ minutes to 911 calls to meet community expectations.

the city should budget for 882 patrol positions, which is 108 more than are funded in the current city budget.

Giovanni Circo, a professor at the University of New Haven (a private school where more than a third of the student body is majoring in criminal justice), is the study's lead author.

Circo developed a machine learning model - basically, a complex algorithm that analysts can use to work with huge data sets to analyze 6 million officer responses to 2 million calls for service between 2016 and 2020. Even when only looking at the most urgent calls - those coded by 911 dispatchers as P0 or P1, typically meaning an imminent threat to life and safety - that's still nearly 346,000 encounters; less urgent calls were also examined to better understand how officers use their time.

More than half of the P0 or P1 calls were categorized as either "check welfare" or "disturbance," which are broad categories

for calls that require a police response. As APD's Chief "What the study Data Officer Dr. Jonathan shows is staffing Kringen describes it, the goal is risk prioritization. A creates time and "disturbance" call may include a neighbor smoking a joint in public (a lowestpriority P3 call), behaving erratically (a higher risk level), and appearing to

hold a weapon (P0). Maybe when the police arrive, officers ascertain quickly that the neighbor is actually holding a spoon, which they had no way of knowing in advance. Perhaps the 911 caller made up the part about a weapon, knowing that claiming someone is waving a gun will force the police to respond to what's actually a nui-



sance call. (This is roughly the sequence of events that preceded the April 2020 killing of Mike Ramos by APD Officer Christopher **Taylor**, now under indictment for murder.)

In all P0 and P1 calls, first responders are faced with two choices and four outcomes: respond quickly or not (mostly

determined by staffing), and find either an urgent situation or a false alarm. By drilling down into the outcomes of each of a huge number of calls, with special attention to those that resolve public safety threats (like arrest, or recovering a firearm), the study concludes that to respond



NEW COVID ORDERS FOR BUSINESSES NOW IN EFFECT

Businesses in Austin and Travis County are being ordered to post signage regarding whether customers and employees are required to wear face masks and provide proof of vaccination, among other health prevention measures.

Last week, Austin Mayor Steve Adler and Travis County Judge Andy Brown issued "Protecting Customers and Employees and Preserving Adequate Workforce Capacity" orders aimed at addressing widespread staffing shortages and growing strain on health care facilities during Austin's current COVID surge fueled by the **Omicron** variant. Under the new orders – which went into effect on Monday, Jan. 17 - local businesses are required to post a notice informing customers and employees of any prevention measures being taken to protect public health. The notice asks business owners to check off either "yes" or "no" options for the following: requiring employees and customers to wear face coverings while on the site (except while eating or drinking); requiring employees and customers to show a negative COVID-19 test; requiring employees to provide proof that they're vaccinated and, when appropriate, boosted; or allowing employees or customers to provide proof that they're vaccinated in lieu of showing a negative COVID-19 test result.

"We are enabling businesses to better protect public health and to make sure they have enough healthy workers to stay open," said Mayor Adler. "This is an example of government getting out of the way of business." The orders also provide for a notice to be posted on the front door so potential customers can know whether or not a business is providing these protections. Meanwhile on Wednesday, Jan. 19, the city distributed some 96,000 face masks to local business owners at an event intended to bolster businesses' personal protective equipment supplies.

The orders come as Austin continues to break records in its COVID metrics. Earlier this month Austin Public Health declared Stage 5 of the local COVID-19 Risk-Based Guidelines amid significant spikes in the local community transmission rate (CTR) and hospitalizations. With hospitalization data including both people who are admitted because of COVID and those who happen to test positive after being admitted for other reasons, health officials have turned toward the CTR as a primary indicator for measuring the state of COVID risk in Austin, As of Jan. 18. Austin's CTR stood at 1.896, while Texas' statewide CTR was reported as 1,562. On Jan. 18, APH reported a seven-day moving average of 120.6 hospitalizations, an all-time high. Last week Austin's test positivity rate rose to 33% - the highest it's ever been - meaning one in three Austinites getting tested are testing positive.

"From teachers, cashiers, and cooks to nurses, techs, and EMS, there's never been a greater risk for all of us in the community to catch COVID-19, and our way of life is in danger because of it," said Health Authority Dr. Desmar Walkes. "We must take as many precautions as possible to stop this spread. Wear well-fitting masks anytime you go out, get vaccinated and boosted, and stay home if you feel sick." Beth Sullivan appropriately to all high-priority calls, APD needs to hire more police officers.

"What the study shows is staffing creates time and availability," Kringen said in an interview with the *Chronicle*. More patrol officers will improve response times, but can also produce the 35% of work hours dedicated to "uncommitted time" that APD has targeted for patrol to spend on proactive policing and community engagement, instead of rolling out to one 911 call after another. But are there ways to attain those goals without spending more money to hire more officers according to a staffing formula? Even if that formula is more sophisticated and data-driven than the arbitrary 2.0 officers per 1.000 residents

championed by the **Austin Police Association**, which would translate into twice as many new hires?

Justice advocates say yes, and that Austin's ongoing, if slowing, effort to "reimagine public safety" is exploring just such solutions. One point of focus for reformers is officer-initiated (OI) calls, which Circo's study design deliberately excludes. A 2020 analysis by the city's Innovation Office found that 35% of patrol time is already being spent on activities officers choose to investigate on their own.

About 94% of the 636,906 OI calls reviewed in that study (from 2017 to 2020) were P3, the lowest priority, which includes the 24%that are traffic stops. Only about 14% of OI calls resulted in a police report, about half as often as do 911 calls.

Just Liberty's Kathy Mitchell, a member of the City-Community Reimagining Public Safety Task Force, argues that City Hall should focus on making APD patrol more efficient before simply adding \$10 million to its budget to hire 108 officers. "All the areas we can make change in now are ineffective uses of officer time [that] put more time on the tally sheet," Mitchell explained, adding that the study "assumes if there is a shortage of officer time, the only way to solve it is to hire more officers." Austin remains a low-crime city where most types of crime steadily declined during the time frame of the GACC and Innovation Office studies, so Mitchell thinks policymakers should not be falling back on historical responses. "We can either hire more police and do more of the same, or we can try a more innovative approach, like taking police out of situations they shouldn't be responding to," Mitchell said.

Though the primary recommendation of the GACC study is to hire more officers, it also suggests that a more efficient allocation of officers could improve response times as well. "Staffing based on anticipated demand, like how a power company might turn on more generators during the winter," also helps to improve response times, Circo told us. "If we can forecast when we might need more officers to respond to crime," the time it would take to respond to urgent calls would drop.

Circo also tells us that he welcomes the calls from local policy analysts to make more of the data and code he used to form the model public. "I think releasing some of it in the future could be a possibility." the

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

professor told us. But some of the findings will be submitted for peer review, and there is commercial value in the model – something that could be sold to other cities as a way of determining appropriate staffing levels there. Ultimately, he says, the data belongs to APD and the study to GACC, so it is up to them to determine how much and when to release it.

At a Jan. 11 press conference, APD Chief **Joseph Chacon** described the GACC study as "one of several tools to help us achieve the right balance for the depart-

ment and community" in terms of staffing levels. He did not rule out asking Council for a midyear budget amendment to help pay for the new officer positions; after meeting with Council members to discuss the reports, he plans to present to City Manager **Spencer Cronk** a road map for how to implement the report's recommendations "in a sensible manner that fits with our city budget."

That response highlights another problem: APD can't fill the vacancies it already has. As of Jan. 19, the department has 227 vacant positions, according to APA President Ken Casaday; a new cadet class of 58 is slated to graduate from the Austin **police** academy in two weeks, and APD has funding for two more classes this fiscal year (ending Sept. 30). Increasing the number of vacant positions to 335 would not lead very quickly to more patrol officers on the street; Chacon says he's developing a "multipronged effort" to address attrition through recruitment and retention. "It's important that we recruit the right type of folks to be police officers in our community," Chacon said. "We have a very robust and diverse recruiting unit that is working on doing that very thing for future classes."



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Hail to the Chiefs

Two candidates remain in the hunt to lead Austin EMS

The search for a new chief to lead Austin-**Travis County Emergency Medical Ser**vices has narrowed to two candidates. Last week, Assistant City Manager Rey Arellano announced that Jasper Brown, a twodecade veteran of Austin EMS and currently its interim chief, and **Robert Luckritz**. a

former EMS chief and hospital administrator in New Jersey and New England, have made the short list.

Each candidate has decades of experience with emergency medical services, but their career pathways are quite different. The outside candidate, Luckritz, worked as a medic for a decade at different EMS agencies in the Northeast before joining Jersey City

Medical Center in 2012, originally as the April 2021; Brown has been interim chief hospital's government affairs director. That major regional trauma center also delivers EMS services for Hudson County. N.J., home to more than 700,000 people within 62 urbanized square miles facing New York City – a population density more than 10 times that of Travis County. Luckritz became chief of the EMS division in 2013. then moved back into the hospital administration in 2018, then left in 2021 to become

chief operating officer at Transformative Healthcare of New England, a private EMS service that contracts with 13 cities in three states. Transformative describes itself on its website as "an innovator in data-driven emergency medical services, GPSoptimized inter-facility medical transporta-

tion, and Mobile Integrated Healthcare."

Brown began his EMS career as a medic in McAllen in the 1990s before joining Austin EMS as a telecommunications specialist (an important job in an agency that relies on radio dispatch) in 1997. He's been working his way up ever since, becoming chief of staff to longtime Chief Ernie Rodriguez, who retired in

ever since. That career path means he's never worked on an Austin EMS ambulance - a point of contention for Austin EMS medics, who feel their leadership is out of touch with what it's like to work on the front lines, especially in the pandemic conditions of the last two years.

At a town hall with the two candidates, held virtually Jan. 13, Brown said, "I really think the morale issues come from a lack of



knowing what's going on." Should he get the chief's job permanently, frustrated medics "will hear directly from me about what's going on ... I think that's one of the key ways to boost morale in the department." Brown cited many ways in which he's tried to improve communication, including town halls with staff as well as emails, videos, and podcasts he's produced to discuss issues important to the workforce.

This hasn't always worked in the ways Brown has intended, however. In one video that gained instant notoriety, the interim chief declared, "If you don't like what I'm doing now, you're not going to like what I'm going to do in the future, because not much is going to change." That's not hard for front-line medics to believe; they see low morale among EMS' overworked and underpaid sworn staff as the product of



CLEAT BLACKBALLS EMS UNION FOR STANDING AGAINST FAILED PROP A

While the city enters the home stretch of its search for a new chief for Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services (above), the union representing front-line medics and its president Selena Xie have come under unabashed and unprecedented attack from the state's most powerful police lobby, the Combined Law Enforcement Associations of Texas, or CLEAT.

The statewide group had included the Austin EMS Association (like other fire and EMS unions around Texas) as an affiliate, which gives the medics access to the Capitol as well as legal support in contract talks (which are underway now) and employee grievances. But not anymore! The CLEAT board voted unanimously to disaffiliate with AEMSA after the union's political action committee opted to campaign against Save Austin Now's proposed police staffing initiative, which failed badly at the polls as Proposition A last November. The Austin Police Association and CLEAT campaigned assertively for the SAN measure, and CLEAT says AEMSA was not transparent about its efforts to the contrary.

In a Jan. 13 letter to AEMSA members, CLEAT President Marvin Rvals makes no attempt to hide the rationale for his board's decision. "It is clear to all of us that the actions of your elected president [Xie] intentionally caused harm to the rank-and-file police officers and their local union [APA] who were actively campaigning for increased staffing, doubling of officer training, and overall better working conditions," Ryals wrote. He later adds that Xie's actions made AEMSA "a tool of Mayor Steve Adler and police hater Greg Casar," and that members who continue to pay dues directly to CLEAT will continue to have access to its legal team.

The public breakup could have been timed to be as painful as possible, in the middle of labor talks, but AEMSA is using its own funds to retain its lead negotiator with the city. In their own letter to union members. Xie and the AEMSA board write that. "Historically, we have never sought approval by CLEAT for our previous political endorsements. For years, all parties understood that we at AEMSA were free to make the political decisions necessary to protect our medics. Prop A was no different, and, as always, we left this conversation at the local level." - A.S.

failed leadership across the board for many years, with Brown right in the middle of it.

Brown's attempt to deflect that criticism hasn't gone over well at all with many Austin EMS medics, and fear and anger at the prospect of his landing the gig permanently has reached a fever pitch in recent weeks. A post that topped the **r/Austin** subreddit on Jan. 4, authored by a group of disgruntled medics, one of whom the *Chronicle* met in person to verify their identity, described the situation at ATCEMS as "FUBAR" and the "result of decades of mismanagement." The thread is filled with comments from current and former ATCEMS medics testifying to the accuracy of the original post.

Here's one of the most recent examples: At an employee town hall on Jan. 13 last week, Brown offered twice the normal hourly base pay to medics for shifts they volunteer to fill between now and mid-April - a form of COVID-19 hazard pay that medics have demanded since the pandemic began. The bonus has boosted morale, but also illustrates how hard and long medics have had to push for what they see as basic employee benefits and protections. Some members of the Austin EMS Association, the union representing the agency's 600 sworn staff, would like to hold a no-confidence vote on Brown's leadership, but have yet to persuade union President Selena Xie to do so.

Luckritz, in contrast, would automatically bring culture change by coming in from the outside, and he has direct experience not only in leading an EMS service but in running ambulance calls as a medic in big cities. (As we previously reported, the EMS chief job posting originally required this experience, which would have rendered Brown ineligible, but was quietly amended during the search process.) At the Jan. 13 town hall, Luckritz committed to "get out on the streets and get to know people, spend time on the night shift, spend time rotating through the crews, holding town halls and listening to the staff."

Plea reached in arson of Democratic Party HQ

Travis County Democrats are alarmed at the sentence being contemplated for the man who fire bombed their East Austin headquarters four months ago. U.S. attorneys prosecuting the case have crafted a plea agreement with **Ryan Faircloth**,

accused of arson, that would send him to prison for five to six years – the most lenient punishment available in the case.

Under federal sentencing guidelines, Faircloth could receive as many as 20 years. One of the things that can lead to a longer sentence is if the arson constitutes an act of **domestic terrorism**, which the FBI defines as "violent, criminal acts committed by individuals or groups to further ideological goals stemming from domestic influences, such

as those of a political, religious, social, racial, or environmental nature." Local Democratic officials say this describes exactly what Faircloth did. "It's hard to argue that this wasn't domestic terrorism – you know, designed to intimidate people for political reasons," said **Cynthia Van Maanen**, executive director of the **Travis County Democratic Party**. "In fact, that's the most important element of it."

According to the government's proposed plea agreement, at 2am on the morning of Sept. 29, Faircloth brought a Molotov cock-

tail assembled from a wine bottle and a sock to the TCDP headquarters at 1311 E. Sixth St. He threw a rock through the glass of the front door and dropped the Molotov cocktail and a lit firecracker into the room, starting a fire that reportedly caused \$20,000 in damages. Faircloth also left a threatening, if ridiculous, note stating, "You can have the Golden State/the financials of New York/the mountains of Colorado" and other places - "But the one thing you can't have is

Texas. Consider this a 'light' warning." Van Maanen and her colleagues have filed a civil suit against Faircloth seeking over a million dollars in damages. But they are also watching the criminal proceedings closely, perplexed that U.S. attorneys are going easy on Faircloth. They don't understand why the



words "domestic terrorism" don't appear in the proposed plea agreement, especially after the Department of Justice announced the establishment of a task force on Jan. 12 focusing on domestic terrorism, warning of a "persistent and evolving" threat.

The same evening that the task force was announced, Travis County Democratic Party Chair **Katie Naranjo** appeared on *The Rachel Maddow Show* and described six different terrorist attacks that Central Texas Democratic groups have experienced in the last two years. She singled out the **Biden bus incident** from Oct. 2020, when police in San Marcos refused to come to the aid of Democrats being chased by Trump supporters on I-35. "I'm glad that the DOJ is finally going to be taking this seriously," Naranjo said. "Because does someone have to die, does someone have to get hurt, does someone actually have to be run off the road in a car wreck for this to be terrorism or for this to be real?"

District Judge **Lee Yeakel**, himself a former county chair of the Republican party, is expected to sentence Faircloth sometime in the next two to four months. Democratic officials note that Yeakel is not required to accept the government's proposed plea agreement. He could send Faircloth away for longer if he deems it to be in the best interests of justice.

ANOTHER LAWSUIT ACCUSES APD OF USING EXCESSIVE FORCE

Austin is facing more lawsuits from citizens complaining of the **excessive use of force** by police than at any point in its history. The latest, filed on Jan. 6, accuses an **Austin Police Department** officer of shooting an unnamed girl with a bean bag round during the arrest of her brother.



Attorney **Jeff Edwards** filed the suit on behalf of the girl's mother, **Shivon Beltran**. "They were treating this like they just nabbed [John] Dillinger," Edwards said. "I have not seen the police reports – because they wouldn't give them to me – but she was an unarmed 15-year-old girl who had just graduated from the ninth grade, who posed a danger to no one. That's why we filed the suit."

The suit describes how in June of 2021 a group of officers arrived outside Beltran's home to execute an arrest warrant and ordered the family to come out the front door. The girl's mother and brother did so and the brother was put in handcuffs. "APD officers then yelled for the young girl to exit," the lawsuit reads. "She walked backwards as instructed until she feared she might fall. She turned around so that she did not fall. She posed no threat or danger to anyone. She was an obviously unarmed 15-year-old girl. Despite this, an APD officer shot her with a kinetic projectile from his shotgun."

Edwards told the *Chronicle* that the beanbag round hit the girl in the thigh, necessitating several trips to the hospital to treat the wound, which became infected. He and the family are seeking monetary damages for medical expenses, pain and mental anguish, and disfigurement. According to the suit, the officer who shot the girl has not been disciplined. Edwards is quite familiar with the injuries caused by beanbag rounds, which are mesh bags filled with lead pellets, fired from modified shotguns. He represents nine of the 12 people who have filed lawsuits against the city after being shot with the rounds during the 2020 **Black Lives Matter** protests. Many of them, including two of his most seriously injured clients, **Justin Howell** and **Anthony Evans**, were shot in the head or face. "They treat these weapons like they're no big deal and they're a huge deal," he said. "I cannot for the life of me figure out why they continue to do this."

As the *Chronicle* has previously reported, Austin City Council is exploring the possibility of settling the Howell and Evans lawsuits out of court. Edwards wouldn't discuss the cases in detail but said that the recent verdict in the case of **Landon Nobles**, a young Black man killed by an APD officer in 2017, could raise the costs required to settle such suits. Nobles' family was awarded \$67 million in December, a sum that is eight times higher than the city paid out in all the excessive force claims brought against it from 2011 to 2018.

"It clearly shows that people have had enough," Edwards said. "And if they think the police did something wrong, they are going to hold the department and the officers accountable. I think the message is, 'Stop doing this. Start treating all people the way you would expect and hope to be treated or there will be serious consequences.'" -B.B.




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200 Academy Drive: Big Hit or Last Call?

Proposed development would revive the Austin Opera House but faces firm neighbor opposition

The long, one-story, gray building on the oddly shaped parcel at 200 Academy Dr., within walking distance of the South Congress strip, looks wholly unremarkable today. But it's an Austin cultural landmark dating back 45 years, home to vitally important sites on the map of the city's music scene, and poised for a renaissance as part of a mixed-use redevelopment on what's become very valuable land in the urban core.

But for that to happen, the current owners of 200 Academy need to overcome implacable opposition from neighbors and gain nine votes on a 10-1 City Council that often splits 7-4 on the relevant land use issues. With Council slated to take its first vote on the case at its January 27 meeting, we'll soon know: Is it showtime for a new Austin Opera House, or is it last call for live music off Music Lane?

WHERE MAGIC HAPPENED

It used to be an event and meeting space attached to the Terrace Motor Court, one of the Southside's many motels dating back before the interstate, when South Congress was the highway into town from points south. Then Willie Nelson bought it, and in the summer of 1977 the Austin Opera House (known colloquially as "the Opry House") debuted as a 1,700-capacity concert hall, with stadium seating and standing room in front of the stage. It sat on a fragment of land, with an enormous surface parking lot facing the street, tucked between historic Fairview Park - part of the super-neighborhood that most latter-day Austinites simply call Travis Heights - and a SoCo that was just as active and commercial, but extremely different in character, from the strip that exists today. Its remaining motels rented rooms by the hour.

The stony cowboy poets of progressive country held court there, and so did Austin's blues big shots (Asleep at the Wheel's Served Live and Stevie Ray Vaughan's Live Alive albums both capture performances from that stage), but the venue - managed by late concert promoter and Austin music scene legend Tim O'Connor - hosted a wide range of bigger touring acts, in a range of genres that included most everything except opera: Iggy Pop, Red Hot Chili Peppers, the Eagles, Patti Smith, Muddy Waters, Lou Reed, King Crimson, Butthole Surfers, BB King, Tom Waits. And, of course, Willie and his friends. "I grew up just worshiping Ray Charles, so getting to listen to him play with Willie was magic - it's one of my favorite memories there," says Nelson's nephew Freddy Fletcher, who founded Arlyn Studios on the same property in 1984.

The concert hall, which was renamed the Terrace (and still booked by O'Connor) after

Nelson sold the property in 1988, stopped operating as a venue in 1992. Thirty years later, the stage still stands – with portable offices built atop it by later tenants. "It was one of the cornerstones of Texas music in its time," Fletcher says. "That history is really important to me and if we don't preserve it, then shame on us."

Fletcher and his Arlyn Studios partner Will Bridges are now working with 200 Academy's current owner Chris Wallin and his architect/agent Richard Weiss (also a 30-year veteran of the Austin music scene, and the lead architect for Alamo Drafthouse) to bring the Austin Opera House back to life as part of the new mixed-use development – not a re-creation but a reclaiming of the venue's original stage and walls. Via Fletcher, whose mom is Sister Bobbie Nelson, it'll still be in the family.

Fletcher has already, as a developing partner of ACL Live at the Moody Theater, gotten some experience at bringing new life to Austin music mainstays. Bridges, younger than Fletcher, has likewise been a deeply engaged preservationist owner/partner in iconic Austin establishments including the current Antone's location, Cisco's, Deep Eddy Cabaret, and Lamberts Downtown Barbecue.

BUILDING WHAT AUSTIN NEEDS?

Wallin admits that he was oblivious to the property's musical history when he initially purchased it in 2018; the shuttered Terrace had long been used as office space. But he quickly got a word-of-mouth education from folks with memories of shows at the Opera House, including Weiss as well as Fletcher and Bridges.

"Over a period of time I just talked to more and more people and began to understand the value and importance of this venue, and it really changed my whole perception of what could be done," Wallin said. "So then we started to approach it from a different angle; let's try to preserve Arlyn Studios and come up with something more mixed-use, with a buffer of residential development. And so we use that as our guiding principle and what we're trying to build."

The problem Wallin and Weiss now face is a tricky variation of the usual NIMBY vs. YIMBY conflicts that get litigated through Austin's baroque and broken land use regulations. Technically, they don't need a zoning change at 200 Academy to build high-in-

tensity commercial (like a music venue, or a motel) or to build up to 36 or 54 units per acre (depending on those units' size) of multifamily on the eastern edge of the property along Melissa Lane, or even to sell alcohol. That's all allowed by 200 Academy's base zoning, which has been in place since the city adopted its current land use regulations in 1982, though Wallin and Weiss will need to obtain a conditional use permit (from the city Planning Commission) if their project ever gets to a site plan, which will serve as a way for the neighbors to hold them accountable for their promises.

"With the existing base zoning, the project can provide a residential buffer with below-grade parking," reads the property fact sheet prepared by Wallin, Weiss, et al. "The original Opera House will be revitalized with housing above, surrounding retail and a central park replacing a 70-year-old parking lot. We are not requesting upzoning the property, increasing height through a density bonus, or seeking any variances from code. This project can provide much needed housing with zero displacement, adjacent to two transit corridors."

A HIGH HURDLE TO CLEAR

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None of that matters unless Wallin and Weiss can convince Council to remove 200 Academy from the Fairview Park Neighborhood Conservation Combining District, which was adopted in 1986 – which the powerful South River City Citizens neighborhood association and the Greater South River City neighborhood planning contact team both firmly oppose, although both are willing to amend the restrictions it imposes. Such NCCDs, as everyone calls them, are overlays enabled by state law, a tool cities could use to protect historic neighborhoods before they had the power to create local historic districts. There are only a few in Austin - Fairview Park was the first, followed by North University and Hyde Park. along with the business corridors along E. 11th and 12th streets. Most of Austin's were already in place or in progress by the time the city launched its neighborhood planning program in the late 1990s; the neighborhood plan that includes Fairview Park was adopted in 2005, and its future land use map, or FLUM, calls for 200 Academy to be office space. Wallin and Weiss first asked for an amendment to the FLUM in 2019, which was put on hold until they submitted the subsequent zoning case to lift the NCCD a year later. That led to a traffic analysis and ongoing talks with an ad hoc SRCC/GSRC subcommittee, mostly composed of homeowners near 200 Academy, which had moved the two sides closer but not bridged irreconcilable differences over the size of the music venue by the time the case reached the Planning Commission in August.

On the YIMBY side of the land use wars, NCCDs have a really bad reputation, similar to that of planned-unit developments on the NIMBY side. Both of these tools allow for deviations from the 1982 Land Development Code to create, or preserve, or re-create places that would otherwise be illegal, which makes the other side suspicious. The 200 Academy case highlights what urbanists see as the kind of mischief weaponized NCCDs can create, and what preservationists see as absolutely essential safeguards.

Obviously, neither the Opera House nor the Terrace Motor Court were part of the historic Fairview Park neighborhood, which dates back to the late 19th century, conceived by developer Charles Newning as an

(all-white, outside the city limits and taxing authority of Austin) large-lot garden suburb, like Tarrytown would later become. Newning largely fell short of his mark because the tony Austin bourgeoisie did not want to cross the river; the irregular large lots remain, some with their 19th century structures, others with much later homes clustered around the mid-20th century. Fairview Park was just last year granted a listing in the National Register of Historic Places – that historic district does not include 200 Academy within its boundaries.

Prior to the Fairview Park NCCD's enactment, city planners had consistently treated 200 Academy and the Music Lane area as a transitional buffer between a de facto highway and a single-family neighborhood. But the NCCD specifically includes 200 Academy (but not adjoining properties to the west along Music Lane or South Congress) to impose restrictions that reflect the neighbors' very different view of the value of what went on at the Opry House. Those restrictions, Weiss points out with great frustration, would not allow Wallin to rebuild the structure already standing, let alone add more density: single-family compatibility standards, only office uses allowed on the commercial part, a cap of 15 units per acre on residential, and no alcohol sales.

One of the closest neighbors, Brian Beattie, is also a noted Austin musician. His wife bought their house on Ravine Drive (just off Academy Drive to the south) "in 1993, so she experienced the tail end of the 'Austin Opera House' era," he wrote in opposition to Wallin and Weiss' case at the Planning Commission. "Even though the neighborhood had successfully limited the number of events that [the Terrace, by that point] could host, it was still a great burden on the residents. The overflow parking, the trash and noise, and the sheer volume of drunken patrons before and after the events were incompatible with a residential neighborhood. The proposed plans for 200 Academy ... would shatter the balance of the neighborhood, which is already under pressure from the dense development on South Congress."

HEARTS AND MINDS AT SRCC?

After that August Planning Commission hearing, the case didn't make it to the Council agenda until November, at which time it was postponed for more than two months, to the first meeting of the year on Jan. 27. In those intervening 10 weeks, neighbors succeeded in filing a valid petition against removing 200 Academy from the NCCD, which requires the support of the owners of 20% of the land within 200feet of the site, which in this case means about five people. Weiss suggests a potential loophole that would remove the protest. but Austin's track record at defending such decisions in court is pretty poor at present. So he and Wallin, and Fletcher and Bridges. will likely need nine votes.

That means they'll need to secure support from at least a couple of the Council members who've heretofore taken pride in supporting neighborhoods in such disputes and are loath to ever vote against a valid petition. One of these is the CM in whose district 200 Academy lies, Kathie Tovo – a veteran defender of neighborhoods' perceived interests and rights, including against development on South Congress, but now the CM representing most of Austin's Downtown entertainment district (and most of South Congress) and a champion of both the contributions and the needs of Austin's live music industry.



On Tuesday, Jan. 18, Wallin and Weiss took advantage of what may be their final opportunity to change hearts and minds in the neighborhood, at SRCC's general membership meeting, open to the public and streamed on Zoom. Like many of Austin's established umbrella neighborhood associations, SRCC (founded in 1972) has a fairly bureaucratic structure, with lots of committees, and both it and the contact team "typucally support the nearest neighbors," said Laura Toups, a local civil engineer and member of both bodies, who lives a block from 200 Academy (but not within 200 feet).

But at Planning Commission, both groups offered to support the staff recommendation on the case, which would amend the FLUM and the restrictions within the NCCD without removing it and allow for the planned office (including Arlyn) and residential uses. Staff, the neighbors, and Wallin and Weiss all want different square footage limits on the "cocktail lounge" use (what the LDC labels the CS-1 zoning category required for alcohol sales). The neighbors currently would like that capped at 2,500 or 3,000 square feet, the size of the nearby Continental Club; they've also broached recommendations that Wallin and Weiss should build a listening room à la the old Cactus Cafe. That stance is largely "based on the traffic and parking impact," says Toups. "But that sized venue is simply incompatible at that location. It's just too large and too many people. A destination music venue on a residential connector street is just ridiculous."


STILL A THING WORTH DOING

The neighborhood's stance has slowed, but not stalled, the 200 Academy team's roll. Their original intention was to bring the Opera House back exactly as it was, at 42,000 square feet, but that's been scaled back to a 17,000-sq.-ft. size that can accommodate 1,200 fans, which from Fletcher and Bridges' informed perspective is just the right size.

"The size of this venue represents filling a huge void in Austin's live music ecosystem and, therefore, also in the promoting ecosystem," Bridges says. "Austin does not have a single indoor, standing-room venue

between 700 and 1,700 capacity" - a niche O'Connor helped fill at the Opera House/ Terrace and then, later, at the Austin Music Hall. "I describe it as this missing middle. We have lots of artists who sell out Antone's: then where to next? It's a big gap to sell out Stubb's or ACL Live or even Scoot Inn. The outdoor venues we have in those size groups are great, but they're somewhat limited in frequency of shows due to weather and outdoor amplified sound restrictions. Artists used to have organic stairsteps in front of them to build their careers: Liberty Lunch was 1,100 [total capacity], La Zona Rosa was 1,300, and the Armadillo [World Headquarters] was 1,500."

Bridges also sees reopening the Opera House as a needed win to make sure music continues to have a place in the heart of Austin. Citing the city's 2015 Music Census, Bridges points out that venues have had a hard time operating in the Downtown core. "Then we know from other cities that are farther along in their life cycle, when they lose the creative sectors near their urban core, it's not a good sign."

The supportive creative elements in 200 Academy's plan include an Austin music museum adjoining the Opera House venue, and work spaces for music industry businesses (in addition to Arlyn). Still, musicians themselves remain wary of projects that have music at to the forefront of their branding but don't reflect the music culture or are too expensive for musicians to even set foot in.

"To not just be using music's name and saying, 'Oh, we've got music here,' and then it's just some kind of cheesy place, you have to put the right people in charge," Wallin responds. "I don't have that music history or background and I don't claim to and I wouldn't want to be in charge or running it, but I'm a big fan of Freddy and Will and they do a great job at keeping the history and culture.

"In terms of making it affordable, we are looking to do an affordable component," he continues. "We've applied for SMART Housing and we'd like to market that toward musicians. So that's our goal. The tricky part is that we can only do that if we get removed from the NCCD, but if we're able to build enough units, then we would have more affordable units. We'd like to try to figure out how we can target local musicians and try to help them out."

Fletcher says he has roughly five years left on a long-term lease he's had for Arlyn, a studio that's helped helm the most commercially successful albums by Sublime and Butthole Surfers and where, in recent years, Foo Fighters and Frank Ocean have recorded, in addition to a frequent stream of local artists, including Gary Clark Jr.

"I'm looking at the future, beyond the five years on that existing lease, and that's why this is so important," says Fletcher. Both he and Bridges think redevelopment of the property is inevitable, regardless of what the neighbors may want. "Someone could build just a monstrosity - a blah box of whatever and that would probably be the highest and best use if you were looking at it from an opportunistic business standpoint," Bridges considers. "So we feel like we've got this window of opportunity where you've got the landowner and small business owners seeing eye to eye on this preservation element. We've been pinching ourselves that this is an ideal situation. If we don't do this now, our fear is that the property will be developed, but it just won't be done by people that see the value in these cultural elements."



Experimental cinematic leviathan Bill Morrison gets a Texas-sized retrospective of his examinations of movies

and memory BY JOE GROSS

Since Louis and Auguste Lumière invented the Cinématographe and locked in much of what we know as the felt experience of "going to the movies," cinema, filmmaking, etc. has been used as an allegory (with varying degrees of accuracy) for everything from the last word in objective truth to human consciousness itself. But it's not really until you see the films of Bill Morrison that you realize that his work captures something very specific, a feeling cinema has long played with but never so directly, a sensation you didn't know you needed to experience until you do: how human memory actually works.

That experience will be celebrated in a massive retrospective of his ongoing work, one that will connect the Austin Film Society, UT's Visual Arts Center, and the Bass Concert Hall.

For those unfamiliar with his remarkable oeuvre, Bill Morrison, born 1965 in Chicago, Ill., is a filmmaker who came out of the visual arts and animation. Much of his work manipulates old (in cinema terms) found footage: often silent-era, usually free from spoken dialogue. This footage – sometimes lost for decades, sometimes not quite as lost as it first appears – is often profoundly decayed: covered in scratches and blemishes; warped, layers stripped away; images distorted and blown apart and obscured. This effect is not created digitally, nor is it Morrison's doing; it's simply what happens to really old film that is not taken care of. Hence, his work reflects the felt experience of the human memory: an image, distorted over time, stripped of much of its original meaning.

Morrison started in visual art and animation before exploring film – as in the physical stuff, the celluloid and (sometimes) nitrate – as a medium. "I was trying to cram my paintings into animated films," he said. "I found it frustrating just because it was laborious and that labor was evident on the screen." He started thinking it over and realized the camera was already creating those images, 24 every second, for him: "Why don't I use the paintings that the cameras created and refer to their individuality after the fact?"

He started distressing or deconstructing films, shooting film and making photographs from them, then altering them and reanimating that. That wasn't quite nailing it, either. Encounters with the work of experimental filmmaker Ken Jacobs, Peter Delpeut's "Lyrical Nitrate" (a compilation

of film the Dutch filmmaker found in a projection room), and the thunderous a-ha! moment that was Chris Marker's "Le Jetée" turned him toward using aging footage as it was, neither pristine nor artificially distressed.

Morrison had figured it out; since 1990, he's created dozens of shorts and seven ingenious features exploring with these "lost" materials; "these messy frames can speak to the materiality of film," he explained. The films he's working with may have been shot decades ago but they are modern because "they took exactly this long for them to look this way."

His achievement has not gone unrecognized. He's picked up a Guggenheim Foundation Fellowship, received grants from the Foundation for Contemporary Arts, the Creative Capital and Alpert Award in the Arts, and had a midcareer retrospective at the Museum of Modern Art in 2014. Dude is just about as accomplished as you can get in his field without literally being a (art)household name on the level of, say, a Barbara Kruger.

But he's never mounted anything quite like what he is about to do in Austin. In January and February, the Austin Film Society will screen a mess of Morrison's work under the shockingly direct title "Essential Cinema: The Works of Bill Morrison." On Jan. 21, Bass Concert Hall will host a special performance of The Great Flood with a live score by jazz composer and guitarist Bill Frisell. (Morrison's work is usually paired with music, often by some of the best composers alive: John Adams. William Basinski, Maya Beiser, Gavin Bryars, Philip Glass, Kronos Quartet, and Julia Wolfe. With a few exceptions, Morrison cuts to the score, not the other way around.) Elsewhen, UT's Visual Arts Center presents the exhibit "Bill Morrison: Cycles & Loops." This is the first time Morrison's work has been presented thusly, as bits of art that stand on their own rather than a screening of a complete film in a gallery space.

It is an embarrassment of Morrison riches, and the films on offer are a murderer's row of Morrison's work. There's the increasingly legendary *Decasia* (2002), perhaps Morrison's most famous meditation on the materiality of film and the first film of the 21st century to be named to the Library of Congress National Film Registry. Viewers can also enjoy the genuinely gorgeous "The Miners' Hymns," an ode to labor and its consequences using early footage from years of miners' galas and labor strikes in the north of England. Also up are two of Morrison's more documentary-like films, Dawson City: Frozen Time and his 2021 picture The Village Detective: A Song Cycle.

Morrison had been moving toward a more straightforward presentation for some time but these most recent films, with captions and newly shot footage, rewire the extreme subjectivity of his earlier work. *Dawson City* explores both the city itself

- the heart of the late 19th century Canadian gold rush - and a cache of over 500 film prints, preserved by permafrost, discovered in 1977. The footage of the anonymous prospectors, some of whom we see frozen to death in search of their fortunes in a town that went up overnight, is a remarkable look at the way events both vanish and persist (a staple theme of all of Morrison's work, really). "Doing all this research

into the film find, which has long fascinated me, gave me the opportunity to talk about how Dawson City got there via the gold rush of 1896 and 1897," Morrison said, "[which] coincided with cinema as a public event to be shared with other viewers. I found that a compelling coincidence and one that could be teased out by how many crossovers there were between Hollywood and Dawson City."

The Village Detective is as fascinating in a different way. Based on a partial 35mm print recovered from the ocean by an Icelandic fishing boat, it explores that which isn't lost at all: The material is an incomplete print of a popular 1969 Soviet comedy starring the beloved Russian actor Mihail Žarov. "[The late] Jóhann Jóhannsson, the Icelandic composer who wrote the music for "The Miners' Hymns,' contacted me because [he] heard about this fisherman who had pulled up his net and found four reels of a Soviet film in the net," Morrison said. "Turned out Mihail had been in 70-some films over the course of the Soviet era, including as a bit player in a pre-Soviet film. So his life really reflected the rise and fall of the Soviet Union."

Morrison thought that, by sourcing Žarov's films, he could reflect that political upheaval through the roles the actor chose and performed. "I think [*The Village Detective*] is leaning hard on a philosophical idea that life affects art and art affects life," he said. "It brings up the issue that some-

> body can be so familiar to one culture and completely unknown to another, regardless. So it doesn't need to sit on the bottom of the ocean to become a foreign object, even thought I am interested in the materiality of film and how film can reflect historical time, the time between [when] it was shot and now, the way the piece of film was exposed to the time."

Screenings are one thing, but what Morrison is doing

in the VAC is something else. "It occurred to me that in the gallery space, I was free to let my movies behave more like paintings." The viewer can look forward to multiple projection surfaces and a wash of sound in the gallery disconnected from the original score. What it isn't is a movie in a gallery. "I've had gallery shows that behaved more like poor screening experiences," Morrison said. "You had bleed-through from the audio, there was ambient light. Oftentimes there weren't places to park yourself so that you could watch the film from beginning to end. It was just kind of a mess."

This time, Morrison chose to embrace the gallery for what it is, not what it is not. "Let's make this be loops that could be digestible quickly. Then if you wanted to stay and watch several revolutions of the loop, you could feel how they build over time. It seemed an opportunity to address the painterly or pictorial quality of the work without narrative."

Sounds like memory to me.

Luckily, there's all manner of creative goodness produced locally that can be 1) encountered, 2) accessed, and 3) enjoyed via an internet connection. TAKE IMPROV CLASSES

If any community's responding well to the vagaries and upheavals of our current COVID situation, you'd think it would be Austin's improv community – and you'd be right. At least insofar as continuing to provide interactive educational opportunities, Austin's four families of improv – the Hideout Theatre, Fallout Theater, Merlin Works, ColdTowne Theater – have "yes, and"-ed up a wide array of curricula and isolation-confounding fun, offering many ways to get initially involved with (or to hone the familiar craft of) the improvisational performance arts. Four schools, four different flavors of improv; wherever you look, there's a fine chance to improve your mental agility and resilience (and have a hell of a fun time) with local improv professionals. **austinimprov.com**

DAY TRIPS by gerald e. mcleod

The **Magoffin Home State Historic Site** in **EI Paso** preserves the last homestead and the story of one of the Southwest's pioneering families.

Joseph and **Octavia Magoffin** began construction of the white adobe house in 1875. It is one of the oldest examples of Territorial Style architecture in Texas. Over the years the family added to the one-story structure until it became a 19-room, U-shaped hacienda opening to a courtyard.

The city and the state purchased the property in 1976. Joseph's granddaughter lived in the house until her death in 1986, and soon after it was opened to the public.

Because the Magoffin family continuously occupied the house, much of the furnishings are original. Family portraits hang on the wall over Octavia's piano.

The rooms off the main hall are surprisingly small for what would have once passed for a mansion. The 14-foot ceilings and 3-foot-thick adobe brick walls helped blunt the mood swings of the desert weather.

James Magoffin, Joseph's father, established a successful mercantile business in **Matamoros, Mexico**, around 1825. In 1849, he settled on the upper Rio Grande and founded **Magoffinsville**, the forerunner of El Paso. Nearly 50 years later, **John Wesley Hardin** was gunned down in El Paso's **Acme Saloon**.

Joseph returned to his father's extensive real estate holdings after floods and the Civil War nearly bankrupted the family. He co-founded



El Paso's first bank and the school system, and served as mayor, county judge, and alderman before his death in 1923.

The Magoffin Home Historic Site is east of downtown El Paso at 1120 Magoffin Ave. It is open for guided and self-guided tours Tuesday through Saturday, 9am to 4pm. For more information, go to visitmagoffinhome.com.

Austin FC Is the Wake-Up Call Its Texas Rivals Needed

When **Austin FC** made its splashy entrance into **Major League Soccer** last year as the league's 27th franchise and its third in the state of Texas, many in the Lone Star State hoped the surrounding excitement would have a residual effect: Give the Verde's neighbors and their ownership a kick in the pants.

Over the past several years, both **FC Dallas** and the **Houston Dynamo** have become infamous for noncompetitive roster spending, and that penny pinching has routinely reflected in both the league standings and in the attendance figures. In July, the maligned Texas rivals watched as Austin FC shelled out \$7 million to bring **Sebastián Driussi** to ATX, knowing that neither club had ever cracked half that amount on an incoming player's transfer fee.

Those days are now over. Both Houston and Dallas opened their checkbooks wide this week, completing club record transfers on a couple of exciting young South American attackers. The Dynamo on Tuesday announced the signing of 23-year-old Paraguayan forward Sebastián Ferreira from Club Libertad Asunción - where he won two Golden Boots as the Paraguayan league's top scorer - for a reported fee of \$4.3 million. Meanwhile, FC Dallas - fresh off the \$20 million sale of Ricardo Pepi to Augsburg in the German Bundesliga - is set to announce the acquisition of 19-year-old Argentine wunderkind Alan Velasco from Independiente for a fee between \$6 million and \$7.5 million, according to reports from Argentina.

High-profile transfers aren't the only ways Austin FC's older siblings have shaken things up since the Verde landed in MLS. Dallas fired head coach Luchi Gonzalez in September and hired former U.S. men's national team assistant Nico Estévez earlier this offseason. Houston, meanwhile, enters 2022 with wholesale change up and down the front office. There's a new majority owner in real estate mogul Ted Segal, a new general manager in Pat Onstad, and now a new head coach in Paulo Nagamura, who replaces former U.S. men's national team player Tab Ramos. Ramos' contract was not renewed after the Dynamo finished just behind its two Texas rivals at the verv bottom of the Western Conference.

Preseason Schedule Set

The Oaks returned to the St. David's Performance Center this week for the beginning of preseason training. Austin FC will play at least four preseason games before the season kicks off in late February: Feb. 9 vs. **Toronto FC** at St. David's PC, Feb. 12 vs. the Dynamo in Houston, Feb. 16 vs. Mexican club **Atlas FC** at Q2 Stadium, and Feb. 19 vs. **Chicago Fire FC** at St. David's PC. Present and Past Merge in *Parallel Mothers*

Almodóvar and Cruz reunite for a look at motherhood and history and, as always, the result is magical **BY MARJORIE BAUMGARTEN**

Two expectant mothers about to give birth meet for the first time when they are paired together in a room in a Madrid maternity ward. It is a fateful meeting that will bind the two forever in unknowable and unpredictable ways. Janis (Cruz) is a confident woman near 40 who is full of joy and optimism for the future; Ana (Smit) is a scared teenager fearful of everything that lies ahead for herself and her newborn. Neither mother-to-be has a father by her side.

This is not the first time that writer/director Pedro Almodóvar has visited the topic of motherhood in his films. Nor is it the first time he has cast Penélope Cruz in a role as a pregnant character. (*Parallel Mothers* marks the fellow Spaniards' seventh feature film together.) Their collaborations always fit hand in glove as if each were fulfilling the other's thoughts, and *Parallel Mothers* represents the pinnacle of their mutual achievements to date.

Melodrama mixes with light-hearted touches, moral dilemmas, and historical reckoning in

Almodóvar's latest. Although hardly devoid of the filmmaker's signature madcap scenarios and confectionary colors, *Parallel Mothers* downplays these aspects while a newer, more overtly politi-

cal sensibility perfuses his work. Just as the mothers give life to a new generation of dreamers and sustainers. the women's pasts and forebears can shed secrets and answers to the riddles of the present. To say too much here about the turns in this movie's plot and tones would encroach on the viewers' own joy in their discovery. Know, however, that Penélope Cruz delivers the finest work of her career and relative newcomer Milena Smit makes a major international breakthrough as the story's teen mom. Almodóvar encases the entire project in a humanistic glow that finds compassion not only for doting mothers but those who lack what's commonly referred to as the maternal instinct.

Remember the old running gag from the early seasons of SNL in which Chevy Chase and others at the "Weekend Update" desk reported that Generalissimo Francisco Franco was still dead? Well, dead

🗘 A HERO

Asghar Farhadi, director of the Oscar-winning *A Separation*, is a conductor of intensity, giving unassuming situations heightened stakes that feel tremendous. The Iranian filmmaker's latest feature, *A Hero*, is a bubbling thriller about one man's two-day leave from jail and how one innocence-driven good deed tangles itself in a mess that jeopardizes his chances of getting out of jail permanently.

The simple man is Rahim (Jadidi), a grinning young man whose hopes of settling his debt with his creditor are naive at best. These hopes are set high because his fiancée, Farkhondeh (Goldust), has found a bag filled with gold worth enough to pave the way to releasing him from his debt, but a number of signs at the gold buyer leave Rahim hesitant. He decides to turn the treasure in to the police, and a laundry list of myopic mistakes tumbles into a wave of skepticism from those who find themselves involved in Rahim's "good deed."

Farhadi's *A Hero* dabbles in the nuance of a good deed, a fly on the wall directing his own characters, giving just enough space to doubt or trust his protagonist and those with and against him. Farhadi focuses his lens on average people who are forced into tough situations, which is what makes his films so captivating. The simple mistake of giving the police the prison's number to call him stirs up suspicion – did Rahim return the gold from the goodness of his heart, or was it something more calculated?

"If I was smart, why would I be in jail?" Rahim pleads at one point, when everything feels so congested with conflicting information that people once on his side are now shying away from believing his truth. Farhadi doesn't write clear-cut good and bad people; *A Hero* is filled with shades of gray that are enlightening about natural human doubtfulness and equally natural human mistakes. Rahim's creditor (Tanabandeh) isn't some tough, bloodthirsty loan shark: He's just filled with so much distrust and pain that he's unwilling to give Rahim a chance.

A Hero is like watching a high-stakes game of telephone, where information spreads fast, truth is lost, and fabrications create disastrous consequences. Farhadi takes a seemingly simple idea and threads holes and complications into it, creating a pressure cooker of intensity based on a handful of white lies and distrust. It's a tragedy of simple misunderstandings, and misgivings. There are many directors who live for the drama, but none can write it quite as effortlessly as Farhadi.

REDEEMING LOVE



Riley Stearns' Identity Crisis

The Austin-native filmmaker helps Karen Gillan look herself in the eye in Sundance sci-fi drama *Dual*

Dual is not the film about meeting yourself that Riley Stearns originally planned to make. Nor did the Austin-native filmmaker expect he'd shoot his low-key sci-fi drama in Finland. In spite of that, and yet suitably for a story of identity, he said, "It's the most me of the three features I have done. ... Everything about it is straight from me."

In *Dual*, which makes its world premiere at this weekend's virtual Sundance Film Festival, Karen Gillan (*Doctor Who*, *Guardians of the Galaxy*) plays Sara, a woman miserable in her life who finds she only has a few weeks left to live. She also plays Sara, the clone she has made to replace her so that her family won't be quite as sad that she died.

The seed of *Dual* has been growing in Stearns since before his 2014 feature debut, *Faults*. He had a script for a short titled "Niche" that he planned to make as a follow-up to his 2013 short, "The Cub." In that story, he said, "a character ends up in a time loop and meets themselves in the future. I just really liked the idea of putting an actor opposite themselves. Then at a certain point I came up with the idea that you had to duel yourself to the death, and that's the movie."

Filming during COVID has meant challenges for every filmmaker, not least finding somewhere to shoot. In Stearns' case it was the surprise of being invited by the Finnish government to make *Dual* in Finland, "but man, am I glad that we did." There's an unreal edge to his scripts, a disconnect from any specific locations, that allows him to easily to shoot anywhere (at no point when writing his 2019 feature *The Art of Self-Defense*, he recalled, did he ever expect to film it in Louisville, Ky.), but location always has an impact. The distinctive architecture of the city of Tampere, he said, "really lends itself so much to a pseudo-science-fiction narrative," while the unique quality of the light also influenced the look of the film – not always in a helpful way. "By the end of our first day's shoot, we had three usable hours of daylight to work with [but] it really informed the way the characters felt."

Think of how the look of *The X-Files* changed in season 6, when production moved from Vancouver, British Columbia, to Los Angeles. "You don't have these overcast skies, you don't have this dreary dread. You have L.A.," Stearns said, and what he wanted for *Dual* was closer to those early adventures of Mulder and Scully. "I always wanted it to feel lonely and barren, and I feel like that came across so much more in Finland than it would if we'd shot in, say, Kentucky."

But whatever else the near-decade since he wrote "Niche" meant for Stearns, *Dual* allowed him to fulfill his idea of having an actor in two lead roles. Moreover, due to advances in filmmaking technology, "I was able to show [Gillan] her acting opposite herself pretty much in real time right after she would do a take, and she'd go, 'Oh, that's really cool, it's like being on the set of *Avengers.*' No, it's not even close to that, but I love that she said that."

Angel is put through everything from forced abortions to well, other very bad things. Lewis, bless him, again, he's beautiful, but that's about it. Honestly, he isn't good. I was surprised to see a couple of X-Men in this thing but both Famke Janssen and Eric Dane show up as two of Angel's pimps called, hold on to your bonnets ... Duchess and Duke. Janssen gotta eat but she really sleepwalks through this one. Dane. on the other hand, eats so much of the draperv. there's none left for anyone else. The one sunlight flare spot is Logan Marshall-Green as Paul, Michael's brother-in-law, who hates, really hates, Angel. His performance belongs in another, better film.

A Hallmark movie with a major dose of God thrown in, I'm sure there's an audience out there for *Redeeming Love*. After all, 3 million people who bought the book can't be wrong (they can, it's trash). Think *Little House on the Prairie* on Cialis. If you think this film is right for you, ask your preacher if your heart is healthy enough for sex because, madame, this movie might make your blood pressure rise. Side effects may include headache, upset stomach, and the vapors.

A Scream without Wes Craven was always going to feel sad. One of the few horror franchises that kept the same director over time, Craven brought the world of Woodsboro to life, so there was always going to be some trepidation from longtime franchise fans when approaching a fifth installment directed by *Ready or Not* Radio Silence team Matt Bettinelli-Olpin and Tyler Gillett.

Perhaps it helps that Bettinelli-Olpin and Gillett's *Scream* is not centered on Craven's final three: Dewey (Arquette), Gale (Cox), and the one and only Sidney Prescott (Campbell). Rather, the fifth *Scream*'s focal point is a new final girl: Melissa Barrera's Sam Carpenter, a lonely woman whose attempt at staying the fuck out of Woodsboro is foiled when her teenage sister, Tara (Ortega), is brutally attacked by a new Ghostface killer. Like Sidney discovered in the second and third *Scream*, running doesn't always solve your problems, and the town's legendary franchise-inspiring killer always finds a way to resurface the past.

In 2022, Scream is all about the "requel": the reboot/sequel that has made a splash in not only horror but with every major Hollywood studio IP (Halloween, Saw, Star Wars, The Matrix, the list goes on). This is how Scream largely gets away with an entirely new cast for this horror whodunit, stacked with characters who are either distant or direct relatives of Woodsboro favorites. On par with the previous films, Scream's new cast is aces, sharp on-the-rise actors and actresses who are given crunchy monologues to eat up and skeptical alibis to generate suspicion after every kill. Dylan Minnette's Wes Hicks is



a thoughtful homage to the late director, as are twins Mindy and Chad Meeks-Martin (played by Savoy Brown and Gooding, respectively), niece and nephew of longtime fan favorite Randy.

But Ortega and Barrera are the real takeaways. Ortega knows her body, catapulting herself out of danger, dragging herself across the ground with pure determination, and her sly quips about how she much prefers "elevated horror" to basic franchise slashers like the *Scream* movies' self-parody *Stab* are delivered with confidence and precision. Barrera melds strength and vulnerability so well, an incredible successor to Campbell's Prescott. Her Sam also subverts typical horror tropes about mental illness, never presenting it to make her weaker, or for a cheap rug-pull (that said, the CGI visual depiction of Sam's mental illness is likely to be the only thing that will age poorly in the entire franchise).

What has always made Scream a beloved horror series is how it holds up a mirror to the genre without it feeling gimmicky. It's why decades later, the Drew Barrymore opening scene is still chillingly perfect. Bettinelli-Olpin and Gillett are huge horror fanatics, so each grotesque kill carries emotional weight and raises the stakes: But they also know when to play moments for laughs, creating a false sense of security so they can twist the knife harder in the next moment. The fifth Scream is an ultimate reflection of the beloved first film, and perhaps its only misstep is that the directing duo didn't relish in their finale, soaking in some of the beautiful homages they visually set up. Even so, Scream is a blast, a solid setup for more to come.

SING A BIT OF HARMONY

THE TIGER RISING

Metaphors about the emotional cages in which we sometimes enclose ourselves are heady stuff for a family movie. Based on the popular 2001 children's book by Newbery Medal-winning author Kate DiCamillo, *The Tiger Rising* is a fablelike tale about unlocking those cages and setting yourself free, a fairly sophisticated lesson that youngsters may not fully grasp, though they'll likely be fascinated by the captive Bengal tiger at the center of the story. He's a magnificent beast. Just ask



the late 18th-century English poet William Blake, who's smartly quoted here.

Set in the rural Florida Panhandle, the film focuses on two psychologically damaged fifthgraders who form an unlikely bond of friendship based on their outsider status at school: Rob (Convery), a guiet and polite Southern boy, all "ves sir" and "no ma'am" and haunted by the recent loss of his mother (McPhee), and Sistine (Mills), named after the chapel in a running joke of sorts, an angry child of divorce newly relocated to the South who wears her heart on her sleeve. Rob is bullied by his classmates because they can - a dermatological condition on his lower legs, prompting name-calling like "Leprosy Boy," doesn't help — while Sissy (a nickname she responds to when convenient) randomly picks fights with others. The two find comfort in their burgeoning relationship with the maternal Willy May (Latifiah, soothingly good here), the housekeeper employed at the roadside motel where Rob and his broken-down father (Trammell) reside. When Rob takes Sistine to the woods to show her the caged creature he's secretly feeding at the request of the motel's sleazy owner Beauchamp (Quaid, in amusingly runty rooster mode), her first impulse is to emancipate the animal, but Rob initially resists. What ultimately transpires may be difficult for a parent to adequately explain to a child, particularly if it doesn't make a lot of rational sense to the adult.

Director/screenwriter Giarratana occasionally summons up a lovely moment, although the overall tone is inconsistent. Rob's flashbacks to those happier times when his mother still lived eventually feel Hallmark treacly, with an angeliclooking and unrecognizably blonde McPhee his possibly idealized manifestation of the dead parent. But the brief sequences in which Rob's fanciful imagination briefly comes alive, as when a sketched tiger stretches out on the page or a whittled wooden parakeet slightly flutters in his hand, give the movie a sweetly mystical sense, though one not convincingly incorporated in the last act. What Giarratana convincingly achieves throughout the movie, however, is Rob's deep sadness and loneliness, abetted by Converv's sensitive turn. Whenever the kid resignedly reaches down to scratch the rash on his reddened shins. your heart goes out to him. While it's unclear why and how he and the more despondent Rob Sr. have economically tumbled down to a life at the Kentucky Star Motel this side of homelessness, no explanation is really needed. Convery's performance says everything that needs to be said. **1 - Steve Davis

Mugur Călinescu was a pretty typical teenager growing up in early Eighties Romania. Living with his mother in the city of Botosani, the 16-year-old high school student enjoyed hanging out with his friends, listening to music, and developing a newfound political awareness. Under the dictatorship of Nicolae Ceauşescu, post-Stalinist Romania was in the midst of "velvet totalitarianism," and in a steep economic decline. The only culture consisted of state-supported communist propaganda, and Ceausescu's vast army of secret police, the Securitate, were quick to quash anything remotely resembling dissent. And in the autumn of 1981, after a summer of listening to the forbidden dispatches from Radio Free Europe. Călinescu spent some time on his nightly walks (prescribed by his doctor to treat his asthma) rebelliously writing anti-government slogans on fences and the sides of buildings. This graffiti, urging solidarity with Polish worker unions and

decrying the lack of hot water and, well, freedom, prompted a massive investigation by authorities.

Using the Securitate's exhaustively detailed transcripts of Călinescu's case, playwright Gianina Cărbunariu created the avant-garde "documentary play" Uppercase Print, which is now a "documentary film" by director Radu Jude (Aferim!, Bad Luck Banging or Loonv Porn). Jude films the play on six minimalist sets in an inverse theatre-in-the-round, with the actors delivering their lines mostly to the camera. Adding to the Brechtian alienation are the lines themselves: recitations of the various testimonies and reports spoken in a dispassionate, monotone tenor. But brilliantly layered into Călinescu's story is a larger portrait of that period in Romania, as Jude splices in archival footage from state-run television programs of the time, building a dizzying kaleidoscope of juxtapositions. As the Securitate analyzes 30,000 handwriting samples and sets up endless surveillance details, school children sing of the indestructible solidarity of Romania and news reports tout the urbanization of Bucharest. It's the prod and pull of ideology, of propaganda, and what emerges is a radical way of looking at the shifting illusions of history.

Călinescu was apprehended a couple of months later, and subsequently marked as a subversive for his "hostile inscriptions." Four years later he was dead; whether by illness or poison remains unclear, although it doesn't take a lot of mental gymnastics to land on the sinister end of things. Political suppression was the name of the game, as Securitate agents point out in later interviews, the actors framed in an absurd "Last Supper at Craft Services." But Jude and Cărbunariu have brought Mugur Călinescu back to life, and woven him into a complex tapestry that reveals a country's history as a most fragile trompe l'oeil. Restaurant Review: Canje

Chef Tavel Bristol-Joseph showcases Caribbean flavor

Named after the national bird of Guyana, Canje is the passion project of chef Tavel Bristol-Joseph, co-owner and executive pastry chef of Emmer & Rye. Canje features Caribbean cuisine anchored by Bristol-Joseph's native Guyana and spanning flavors and traditions from Puerto

Rico to Jamaica. Caribbean food flies under the

radar in Austin, even though Cuba, Jamaica, Trinidad and Tobago, and Puerto Rico are all represented in Austin's restaurants and food trucks. Some might conflate all Caribbean food with the peppery-hot profiles

of Jamaica, but there's more nuance in the palette of spices: allspice, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, paprika. Alongside native ingredients like plantain, guava, and cassava are the vestiges of colonialism and slavery, like curry, okra, and pigeon peas. All these ingredients are represented at Canje.

The food menu at Canje is divided into four sections: Wah Gwaan, Suppa, Tryating, and Likkle Muore. Before ordering, wait-

staff advise guests that the meals are served sharing-style and suggest a quantity of plates from the first three categories based on the number of people at table. When we were a party of two, our server suggested four to five plates; a party of five, 10 to

12 plates (which ended up being too many). Diners are also meant to

order all their savory dishes up front so that the staff can plan the coursing accordingly.

The menu changes regularly, and I regret having missed out on the roasted okra, as it rotated off-menu between my visits. From

the Wah Gwaan appetizer section, we ordered the bacalaíto fritters and grilled avocado escabeche. The salted cod fritters were fine on their own but brightened up significantly by the surprisingly spicy Cuban-inspired mojo rojo sauce. We particularly loved the escabeche, which thrilled with a smoky, spicy flavor; the contrast of textures between the silky avocado and crunchy-tart pomegranate arils and pumpkin seeds made this a standout dish.

Among our selections from the Suppa menu were the curry wagyu beef, the wild boar pepper pot, and the jerk chicken. From Tryating, we ordered the Guyanese style roti to accompany the curry and the pepper pot and the Carolina Gold rice and blackeyed peas with the jerk chicken. The curry was, essentially, an elevated (and tasty) beef stew, but we were puzzled by the choice to use wagyu for this purpose. The boar, sourced in Pflugerville, played second fiddle to its spectacular sauce, a savory brown sugar-cinnamon mole. Bristol-Joseph's uncle starts the cassareep (cassava root reduction) for this dish in Guyana; it is then transported to Austin for its final preparation. The rich, buttery roti - basically, a laminated flatbread - was the perfect tool to sop up the luscious sauces from both entrees. The jerk chicken was easily the spiciest dish we ate at Canje, and the nutty rice and peas tempered the heat beautifully.

Our two favorite desserts from the Likkle Muore menu were the tres leches cake and the dark chocolate flan. The cake was light and feathery without being







soggy, topped with a layer of tart guava paste and an airy white chocolate-studded cream, giving the dish a Key lime pie effect. The dark chocolate flan was firm and borderline savory, anchored by cassareep syrup and lightened by pink pineapple and crunchy pecans. It was a confident and sophisticated version of a dessert that too often is cloving and squishy.

Canje has a respectable wine list and, to the dismay of my beer-loving partner, a very small beer list. Because the cocktail menu gets prime placement on the front side of the menu, my companions and I focused on those. One friend ordered the Bacchanal, a powerful gin-based concoction she predicted would result in a difficult morning the next day. Another friend described it as having a distinct butterscotch brownedbutter taste. The vodka-based Island Hopping, according to a companion, tasted "like vacation" but had too much ice. I loved my Tamarind Sour; it was like a boozy Sour Patch Kid that made my eyebrows twitch involuntarily. I couldn't get enough of it.

On our first visit to Canje in mid-December, Omicron had arrived in Austin.

We dined indoors, and there wasn't an empty table in the dining room. We were 2 feet away from other parties on all sides, and our unmasked server stood between tables to take orders. The whole experience felt like marinating in a COVID crockpot. On our next visit, I insisted on sitting on the patio, especially since Austin had just gone to Stage 5. On this visit, all the floor staff were wearing masks, which set our minds more at ease.

The patio is eminently Instagrammable, with pothos and Monstera ivies trailing out of mounted planters on the wall, and a brightly painted graphic mural. Even on a 45-degree evening, we felt safe and comfortable, and able to focus on enjoying the meal and the company rather than worrying about COVID (much).

Canje offers diners the opportunity to sample from a spectrum of Caribbean cuisines in a relaxed setting that neither caters to "reggae and rum" stereotypes nor compartmentalizes any given cuisine. Bristol-Joseph finds the throughline of ingredients and flavors from across the region and presents them thoughtfully and in a way that acknowledges the diverse history and experience of its people. I look forward to seeing the menu evolve with the seasons, especially when it comes to that okra.





TASTING NOTES RESTAURANT REVIEWS ARE BACK! (BUT IT'S COMPLICATED.)

The last pre-pandemic restaurant review I filed for this paper never ran. It was of the nowdefunct High Note on South Lamar near Barton Springs, and I submitted it on March 3, 2020. As it so happens, the last pre-pandemic restaurant review this paper ran was one I wrote. At the time, it was unfathomable to think that dining out would become a fraught decision tree of risk assessment, the stakes of which seem to change on what feels like a daily, if not hourly, basis.

As we reintroduce restaurant reviews to these pages, I thought I'd take this opportunity to do some level-setting regarding what restaurant reviews will look like for the foreseeable future. First, for the time being, we're sticking to patios and food trucks. We want to support and nurture our local restaurants, but we also don't want to put workers (or ourselves) at risk. So it's outdoor dining only until Austin returns to Stage 2.

We also won't be reviewing any takeout. It's not fair to the restaurant to judge them based

on a foil tin of lukewarm (at best) enchiladas or a plastic bowl of room-temperature ramen. A restaurant review should portray a restaurant experience as intended: hot food served fresh, eaten in a bustling dining room and not in front of another viewing of the extended edition of *The Fellowship of the Ring*.

We will note excellent service but won't remark on it otherwise. Everyone is shortstaffed, and it would be ungenerous and just plain dumb to expect non-pandemic standards. And, for the time being, we will make note of what COVID precautions seem to be in place in a restaurant, as appropriate. We figure that if we want to know these things, our readers do too.

We are just as eager as everyone else for things to go back to something approximating normal. Until then, these are the guardrails we've put in place to safely and ethically resume restaurant reviews.

Our team is dedicated to creating a warm and welcoming environment for anyone who steps foot into the cafe, and it shows. Our chefs push the limit on what a cafe can create with such limited space and resources." We've been there: we concur.

Shared Frequencies Radio Connects Austin DJs With the World

Online electronic station celebrates third birthday Saturday at Coconut Club

Atefeh Karabi just arrived in Mexico City, on a work trip of sorts for her underground internet radio station.

She's come to meet internet friends who have joined her Austin-based operation, **Shared Frequencies Radio**. The founder rattles off other global commitments: today, a spot on the CDMX's **Radio Nopal**; on Sunday, a Shared Frequencies collaboration with **Hong Kong Community Radio**.

"I am a globetrotter myself," says the Houston native during a call last week. "I travel, and I make these connections personto-person, face-to-face. I give [artists] an opportunity and they take it. After that, it's really word of mouth. Making connections, maintaining it – it just works from there."

The experimental electronic artist **Ranma Entero**, who spurred the station's Mexico City collaboration, will follow Karabi back to Austin to perform at Shared Frequencies' three-year anniversary. The event, this Saturday, Jan. 22, 9pm at **Coconut Club**, also features current station residents like Dallas' **lamyu** and locals **Luvr Boy**, **Sriracha**, and **DJ Case**. Karabi herself performs as **m3hmooni**.

An established DJ based in Austin for the past few years, **Marcos Cabral** headlines the club's indoor laser pit. Karabi cites Cabral – a veteran of **Boiler Room** and the **Lot Radio**, a popular NYC player in internet radio – as a role model. Cabral tells the *Chronicle*: "Shared Frequencies helps develop a local scene, in a nutshell, by gathering like-minded people together."

Three years in, Karabi runs the station with UT graduate student **Ben Randall**, a multidisciplinary artist known as **Pity Party**, and a small team. The founder says their music branches off two genres – house and electronic.

"Anything in that field," she says. "The coolest thing is that I'm able to bring modular artists together with tech house artists, or industrial artists together with disco house artists. Everyone who works with us is open to new ideas."

Seasonal residencies, which last five months, make up the bread and butter of Shared Frequencies. Residents contribute one set a month. Every night, some residents stream live on the station's **Twitch** channel (twitch.tv/sharedfrequenciesradio) – seen in their homes or the station's Eastside shipping container studio – while others stick to audio-only on the station's website (sharedfrequencies.live).

The ongoing sixth season includes **Austin Music Awards** nominee **DJ Shani** among some 40 contributors, from Austin and beyond. The Shared Frequencies **SoundCloud** account

archives all sets – a plus for Austin-based contributor **Gabriel Frampton**, aka **Sriracha**, who maxed out his own free SoundCloud uploads over decades of mixing. He digs through dusty boxes of forgotten CDs, and **Bandcamp**, for his expansive techno sets.

"I've been an obsessive music collector since 1995, and all of that knowledge has stayed with me, you know?" he says. "I didn't have too many people to share it with, other than my equally nerdy music friends who I would see a couple times a year. Getting a wider exposure through the radio station has been a really positive experience."

He also says Shared Frequencies sets are a great place for more abstract sounds not quite fitted for the clubs.

"I love dance music, but that's not all I listen to," he explains. "I listen to weird, abstract, sit-on-couch music too. Those can work really well together, if you know how to mix them right."

The station has collaborated with other local names in electronic, like **Thank You For Sweating** and **FREQ!** Karabi loves to stream live sets at venues and festivals, a great impetus for her globetrotting. She launched Shared Frequencies after moving back to Austin in 2019, unable to renew her visa while working at global-oriented Paris station **Le Mellotron**.

Prior, while studying at the **University** of Houston, Karabi became the first director that wasn't actually a student at **Rice University**'s **KTRU**.

"Right after university, I moved to Europe," she recaps. "I saw that they were highlighting more underground radio, not college radio, but more independent stations. I'm trying my best to bring it to Austin. It's opening a door to the world, through the radio, for our artists."

CROSSTALK

DANIEL JOHNSTON. CELEBRATED in the first-ever museum exhibition of the cult artist's work, earns a mural to accompany. On Saturday, Jan. 22, at 12:30pm, the Contemporary Austin unveils a new artwork on the side of the building, funded by Vans and local skate shop No-Comply. Fans are invited to join members of the late Texas songwriter's family at the ribbon cutting. The mural features colorful characters from Johnston's work, like the iconic frog-ish Jeremiah the Innocent and the ghostly Casper. Inside, the exhibit "Daniel Johnston: I Live My Broken Dreams" runs through March 20. And like many planned January events, the Hi, How Are You Project's Johnstonhonoring HHAY Day has been postponed to May 4 at the Moody Theater (featuring Grouplove, Polyphonic Spree, Kate Davis, and more).

FRANK RODRIGUEZ, a former aide to Mavor Steve Adler, pleaded guilty last week to misuse of federal funds while running the nonprofit Latino HealthCare Forum. (Find more details on the case on p.6.) Rodriguez, a Latin jazz musician, is also known for longtime involvement in Austin music advocacy. The policy advisor co-founded the nonprofit EQ Austin - focused on equitable cultural representation in Austin music – with current Austin Music Commissioner Gavin Garcia in 2018. Rodriguez also served on the board of advocacy group Music Makes Austin. Both organizations fall under Gary Keller's Austin Music Movement umbrella of supported music nonprofits. Representatives from both organizations did not respond to the Chronicle's request for comment.

JACKIE VENSON opted to cancel

upcoming Texas shows due to the surge in Omicron cases. The band offers a livestream show this Saturday, Jan. 22, at 9pm, with \$5 tickets at jackievenson. bandcamp.com. Earlier this month, the Austin-based artist posted on social media that the **Brauntex Theatre** in New Braunfels "was unwilling to accommodate" requirements like proof of vaccination/testing. Last week, she pulled out of the Woodlands' **Dosey Doe**, writing, "Once again, a venue is forcing me to choose between playing shows and protecting the health and safety of my band, my crew and y'all."

THE AUSTIN MUSIC Disaster Relief Grant. launched last year. reopens with \$2.3 million in federal relief dollars. The program offers onetime \$2,000 grants to local "professional musicians, independent promoters, and music industry workers facing hardships due to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic." Applications are open until Jan. 28 at 5pm. The city partners with the Long Center to distribute grants and with Texas Accountants and Lawyers for the Arts to help applicants. Find more eligibility info on our Daily Music blog.

THE HELP CLIFFORD Help

Kids Benefit, the annual fundraiser's 21st edition, has been postponed to March 3 at Antone's. Initially planned this month, the concert features Austin staple Jimmie Vaughan and special guests. Founded by Clifford Antone and Robin Shivers, the event benefits Austin-based nonprofit American YouthWorks, which provides critical educational and career support to young people.

Driven MC J Soulja stays focused on his goals: greatness and creating career opportunities in Austin rap **BY DEREK UDENSI**

"God has blessed me and I say that just being here because there's been times where I wanted to quit and I done been through so much crazy shit," J Soulja confides in an interview just before Thanksgiving.

Quit what?

"Quit rap, n---a. Quit all this shit. I've dealt with a lot of just mental shit."

Perceived lack of acclaim for his new music, creeping self-doubt, and life's inexplicable hardships caused him to contemplate giving up rap altogether. Negative thoughts sometimes take over his psyche, especially when he reflects on his infant son's tragic passing in 2018 and the loss of several more people close to him. He spent the previous Thanksgiving – and Christmas – locked in with producer Steelo Foreign at Elevate Studios due to COVID-19 limiting his usual familial holiday gatherings. Those studio sessions eventually formed the foundation of latest release *More Than Nothin*'.

"I'm a human and it's easy to get caught up in this world when you're so passionate about doing what you're doing, making a change, and building an empire," he adds. "Sometimes you get moments like this where you gotta talk to somebody who's making you really just realize how blessed you are."

If you weren't paying attention, you might not grasp the degree of difficulty in J Soulja's sacrificial juggling act, striving to progress his own rap career while also carving out opportunities for his peers in a town still lacking a solid hip-hop infrastructure. The impassioned creative's monthly Pre-Roll open mic showcase at Flamingo Cantina has been running since July. The Smoke Out, his main concert series that's become his signature as a promoter, finally makes its return on March 19 as an official South by Southwest 2022 showcase. His 32-artist, March Madness-style, single elimination contest: the Smoke Out ATX Tournament – culminating in a local hip-hop act getting a SXSW slot – reemerges next month, COVID permitting. And Six Square, an organization working to preserve the Eastside's cultural legacy, made him its director of cultural and artistic liberation last year.

"You don't get any awards for stepping up to the plate and doing shit that n----s would never do," says the 29-year-old, in reference to both his 2018 song "Awards" and lack of recognition for his efforts to cultivate Austin's rap scene. He at times references his own lyrics as answers, which perhaps serves as a great barometer of his music's authenticity.

"There ain't no trophies for that kind of shit."

SWISH!

The interview takes place at Bennu Coffee on Austin Community College's Highland campus, thus unintentionally bringing his career full-circle. A close friend suggested that he apply for an ambassador deal with Swisher Sweets after spectating a less than favorable Nwe Year's Eve 2017 Swisher New Orleans showcase headlined by Cardi B. Then working at various ACC campuses as a janitor, J Soulja sent in an EPK at the start of 2018 and initially didn't get the role. One Monday, he opened his mailbox and suddenly received a multithousand-dollar check and a cordial invitation from the cigar brand to fly to Los Angeles. He quit his job immediately and arrived in California two days later.

J Soulja becomes a little emotional when reflecting on the time period before leaving his janitorial position at ACC. "That shit was some of the most humbling times of my life," he says shakily. "At the time, I got full custody of my son. I'm cleaning up ACC. I'm there from 6pm to 6am. I'll clean my building for about four hours and go to the studio. About two in the morning, knock out a couple verses for my album, finish my building, and go pull up on my granny where my son was for the night. Sleep with him, wake up, and do the same thing every day."

That Swisher Sweets ambassador deal provided a window into how an artist must remain cognizant of their value when negotiating any sort of deal or booking arrangement. A guideline on how to properly run shows that benefit artists also followed. Swisher wanted him and simply cut the check. According to J Soulja, local hip-hop acts don't receive the same courting afforded to musicians from other genres.

"Austin doesn't have leaders in hip-hop who are courting artists like they're valuable," he says. "They court artists like they're people who are taking up space in the club to help them with their dollar. I've been privileged enough to be a universal hip-hop artist and be able to perform on sets with rock & roll artists, jazz artists, and country artists. The way that they court those creatives compared to hip-hop is totally different."

"WAY TOO STUBBORN WITH MY GOALS/ TAKE ME WHERE THE JOURNEY GOES"

Endorsement money from the Swisher Sweets deal allowed someone with no experience to kick-start his Smoke Out series in 2018. When he saw how successfully the first event went with him as the headliner, he decided to use his new platform as an avenue to spotlight his peers while also paying them for their performances. The Teeta headlined the Smoke Out 2 and Quin NFN, then eight days past his 18th birthday, headlined the event's third edition – shows he claims marked the first hometown soldout headlining performances for two of Austin's most prominent rappers. When you look at the statistical trajectories of those two artists in relation to his own, you may wonder what's the incentive in promoting others in a competitive sport like hip-hop, outside of obvious financial benefits as a promoter? For J Soulja, there's knowledge of an unfavorable ratio between those desiring to rap and those who possess the resources – and willingness – to maneuver those artists toward a chance at success.

"I can humbly put my rap against [anyone] because I, respectfully, know that n----s not going to rap the same way that I'm rapping," he proclaims. "I done put my 10,000 hours in. I don't mind you rap better, get farther, whatever. I don't give a fuck. I want to see you win! Let's open these doors up, that way [people] can walk through them because there's n----s out here who don't rap anywhere close to me but are surpassing things a lot more than what I may have ever been able to touch.

"And I don't hate on them."

He's not directing these words to any artist in particular but rather hurling them at people who may denounce his importance off one glance at a number – such as a Spotify listener count.

"I salute them. And there were times where, as a real n---a, I didn't know how to salute them. I had to humble up and realize

where the demand was and how we can exploit these spaces in Austin hip-hop that motherfuckers don't know how to maneuver. I'm selling out shows with local artists. That's something that's taboo here. I'm not trying to put you on so I can take your light. We're developing win-win situations like, 'Let me put you in this position to shine. I'm gonna show you how we're gonna ball and we're going to have transparent communication.'''

For those questioning his merits to rep Austin as a result

of his family moving to Pflugerville from the Eastside, the former Andrews Elementary student serves up a bar for that as well.

"If I'm from Pflugerville, you n----sbetter be lucky that it's somebody who down to put on for this shit the same way that I do because nobody does it," the Hendrickson High School alum passionately asserts.

He fittingly spits lyrics penned for "What It Is" off 2020 project *From the Soul* soon after.

"Straight out of Austin, hoe, that's where I'm from/ That's where I was/ Why I do this shit the way I does/ That's what I did/ Was on this rappin' shit since I was kid/ Raised in the 'ville, but I won't hesitate to bust yo' lip."

"It's in the music – it doesn't offend me to be honest," he continues. "I've broken codes here in Austin that n----s have been trying to do for years and I've had to play these roles for the simple fact that I don't have anybody to help me out. I don't have a team. I run this shit independently.

"I've got to wear these hats. It's mandatory. If I don't do it, who else will do it?"

10,000+ HOURS

Before putting 10,000 hours into developing his craft, the resilient emcee first started rapping around the age of 10 after hearing his father sing on an R&B demo. His father began to teach him how to sing, so he later tried out some of those methods with a neighbor named Donnie Pompey. Influenced by the likes of Chamillionaire, who he refers to as his favorite rapper growing up, Houston heavyweight Z-Ro, and Screw tapes, J Soulja aims to bring authenticity and rawness to his music on a level similar to his inspirations.

"I want to reinvent Texas music – I want to be able to make those records like a Mo City Don," he explains. "I want to have those kind of feels to a record where it's just raw, authentic material from the soul, from the South. This [latest] project was just kind of tapping into this character, this new definition of what I want J Soulja to be recognized for in the next five to 10 years." After releasing solid projects *From the*

Soul and This Ain't Shxt as "throwaways" in

2020, October 2021 release More Than Nothin' sounds noticeably polished in comparison. The featureless 10-song album contains the best production and mixing of his career while he sounds more focused than ever on the mic. "Roof," a track concocted during last February's horrendous winter freeze, features a hook befit for any setting ranging from a large social gathering to cramped quarters devoid of proper heating. "Top Down" contains a slew of quotables touching on his faith,

resilience, and flexes about his local status.

His eighth studio album and September 2021 extended play, *SouljaSzn EP*, recently earned him a place in the final five voting spots for Best Hip-Hop/Rap at the 2022 Austin Music Poll – marking his first time making the final voting cut. He refers to the initial release of the LP as merely a "soft launch" for a more revealing deluxe version set for an unveiling some time this year.

"It's time to really bring people in all the way," he says. "Getting more into the topics with my son, topics with my relationship with my daughter's mom, and getting more into the topics with a lot of shit.

"I feel like for a lot of time in my career, I did everything I [could] to try to create some kind of identity and none of it ever stuck. Now that I have the education that I have as far as how marketing goes, how to



tell a story through my marketing, and how to create narratives for myself that I want people to be able to find commonality with, I think now is the time."

4LIFE4EVER

The founder of 4Life4Ever Entertainment envisions himself becoming a figure who guides young street artists on how to maneuver themselves before ideally attaining ambassador and sponsorship deals. On a macro scale, he wants to support artists from the bottom of their careers to the middle; the middle to the top is the far easier journey. On a personal level, rather than signing artists to a deal, he offers guidance to artists he sees serious potential in. He's only worked closely with Yung Bryse and mentors Shaunsolo "here and there." Bryse made the Chronicle's June 2021 "21 Austin Rappers to Know in '21" story off the strength of debut LP Trill Livin'.

"My whole goal with 4Life4Ever Entertainment is to reinvigorate the urban entertainment experience," J Soulja says.

His role at Six Square also presents him with the opportunity to put on events and spotlight artists digitally while getting a better understanding of the Eastside.

"Like I said [on 'Top Down'], 'Stubborn with my goals/ Take me where the journey goes.' If that emcompasses me having to wear a hat for another company to learn how to maneuver on the Eastside much better than I may have before, that's what I have to do. Shout-out to [Six Square Executive Director] Pam Owens."

Though he started the interview on a bit of a downside, these two hours of conversation remind him of what he's accomplished via his own independent efforts. "I got here for being me – and that's the main thing that I'm thankful for and that's the main [reason why] I don't mind the pace of my career," he says proudly. "'Cause there'll be a lot of n----s who'll be like, 'J Soulja, so and so got more this.' That's cool, bro.

"I know that my time will come. I've done things that n----s would never, ever fathom to do and they got more followers than me. They got more notoriety than me. I'm blessed, bro. I'm a unique individual."

He shares optimism for Austin's rap scene, too. Permanently shuttered Seventh Street locale Scratchouse hosted previous iterations of both the Smoke Out and his tournament, yet he views the ongoing pandemic period as a chance to stake new ground even as numerous venues have closed for good.

"We got a lot of people here who are seeing the scarcity and the necessities of what's here and [the scene] is also in a space of new territory," he says. "I believe that it's in a space where it's for the taking. I'm blessed to be in the position right now where I'm trying to pioneer the underground, pioneer the streets, and I think the future holds for me providing more outlets and more services.

"And really grooming talent. Stapling myself as that guy for the community that is a true advocate for Austin hip-hop and Austin creatives."

J Soulja performs January 29 at Flamingo Cantina with Shordie Shordie and then hosts the Smoke Out ATX Tournament at Flamingo Cantina on Feburary 1 before hitting Come & Take It Live with Dave East on Feburary 3.



WHAT WE'RE LISTENING TO + RESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

KYDD JONES SHINES ON ONYX D'OR (NO MORE WAITING)

Few local artists staved as musically active as Kydd Jones during these past 22 months. The East Austin emcee combines 11 previously released cuts with five brand-new ones to deliver an enthralling package of tracks representing his first album since 2018's Homecoming. On it, Jones strikes through myriad hip-hop/ R&B sounds and mints his first collaborations with fellow local stars Jackie Venson and Quin NFN. "Crispy Sprite' rightfully opens the project with the words "release therapy" before a



soothing sax guides listeners into another delightfully mellow song, "Harpoon." "Sam's Club" features the aforementioned reigning Austin Music Awards Musician of the Year providing a guest verse over an instrumental containing slight electric guitar assists befit for her discography. "Jet Seats" sees the LNS Crew founder infectiously declare his need to "get used to this ice like Gretzky," while the 21-year-old NFN member says he may just go to Chicago to grab another advance. Onyx D'Or (No More Waiting) streams everywhere, but Bandcamp's got the extended version. - Derek Udensi

INGEBRIGT HÅKER FLATEN'S MUSICAL TRAVELOGUE (EXIT) KNARR Bassist Ingebrigt Håker Flaten has lived and made music

all over the globe - from his native Norway to Chicago to Mexico City to, for the longest period of his life, Austin. The pandemic put him temporarily back in his home country, but once an Austinite, always an Austinite (just ask Lucinda Williams). Alongside local gigs and his Sonic Transmissions Festival, he includes Austin in (Exit) Knarr, a musical travelogue commissioned by the prestigious Vossa Jazz Festival. Like the planet on which they were recorded, the songs stretch far and wide, tapping as many influences (free bop Latin music, fusion, spiritual jazz) as there are locations that inspired them. The melodic, vibrant "Brinken," named after the Trondheim neighborhood in which Flaten currently rests, feels key - it's music made by a man at peace, but still excited by the future. "Miles Ave," named after Flaten's Austin street, interprets this constantly evolving city through a mess of handclaps, horn bleats and guitar squeals before locking on to his bassline and riding it to the finish line. Austin may not be his physical residence for the moment, but (Fxit) Knarr makes clear that Flaten will always consider it, and the other cities to which he pays tribute, home. Michael Toland

ROSE SINCLAIR RIDES THE WAVE

Sundays at Sam's Town Point belong to steel ace Rose Sinclair, whose residency has recently swung with a jazzy cocktail shuffle. New digital EP Wave captures the steel-tuned magic of her quintet, the combo grooving smoothly through jazz standards. The jaunty "Secret Love" leads the six-song instrumental set, showcasing Dan Walton's piano in the cool bossa nova of "Summer Samba." Duke Ellington's "Perdido" pops behind Lyon Graulty's sax, and centerpiece "Black Orpheus" sways beautifully, letting Sinclair's steel flow languidly across the melody. Sinclair sinks best into the bossa novas, so Antônio Carlos Johim's title track lays the perfect capstone to highlight her versatile steel arrangements. - Doug Freeman

CARSON MCHONE CRIES ALL THE COLORS ON "STILL LIFE"

There's a double entendre at work, intentionally or not, in "Still Life." The term refers to an age-old painting style: realistic depictions of inanimate objects - fruit, vases, flowers. Then there's the existential wordplay: with "still," used adjectively, meaning "remaining alive" or, as a noun, connoting a life without motion. Austin-born-'n'-raised songwriter Carson McHone, now residing in Canada, presages her Merge Records debut with the strongest single of her career. Poetically honest as ever, in a slight voice - big with emotion - she depicts a sleepless, tasteless, monochromatic passage of time, erupting with the novel hook: "I cried all the color from my eyes" - still somehow sounding resilient. The production, boiling into an emotional explosion of cyclonic distorted guitar and incessantly plinked piano, fits an album deserving of bigger stages than the country bars where she cut her teeth. - Kevin Curtin

BERKSHIRE HOUNDS LAMPOON ADULT LIFE IN "ISN'T IT GREAT?"

The last time we heard new music from Berkshire Hounds, they were pouring a glass of wine on the seductive, Marvin Gaye-like single "Let Me Be Your Sherpa Tonight." Now, the gang, containing the leads from Magic Rockers of Texas and PR Newman, are back with a fun song about existential crisis. "Isn't It Great?" arrives as a speedy dose of guitar-riff-fueled power-pop where every section sounds like it could be the chorus. Spencer Garland uses different voices - goofily optimistic and sneering - to convey life's various states of confusion. If I ever said, "May the Berkshire Hounds never grow up," I'm eating my words. - Kevin Curtin

Walking to the club on a cold, rainy Tuesday, during yet another COVID spike, my expectations are as low as the January temperatures.

But upon entering the century-old remodeled house that is Half Step, the stresses of frigid weather and modern existence are vanguished by the warm atmosphere of vestervear. With every seat filled, there are more people in here than the entire three-block stretch of Rainey Street.

It's 15 minutes before showtime and Mac Mcintosh has personally greeted half the room with a hug, handshake, or inside joke. His personality is, in its own way, the perfect opening act.

For eight years Austin jazz and blues devotees have known Mac as the dark, confident voice fronting the Michael Hale Trio every Tuesday at Half Step, but for over a decade I've known him affectionately as "Daddy Mac." We met at the erstwhile Legendary White Swan on 12th & Chicon where, every Monday, he'd come in to see the Little Elmore Reed Blues Band, Two steps in the door, he'd effortlessly have a glass of scotch in one hand, a dancing partner in the other, and the band would be calling him onstage to sing a song a request he'd always be happy to oblige.

Mcintosh, a prodigious vocalist who didn't begin performing until he was in his 50s, eventually caught the attention of B3 maestro Mike Flanigin, who tapped him for regular singing duties at his Continental Gallery residency. It was there that he first connected with multitalented drummer Michael Hale, who'd been backing Austin soul-priestess Tameca Jones.

Though he'd never been in an actual band, Mcintosh felt a connection with Hale and asked if he'd be interested in forming a new group. What started as an attempt to resurrect the Great American Songbook soon flourished into an energetic and creative mix of music spanning the 20th century. Hale's Trio, also consisting of bass player Jimmy Blazer and keyboardist Dayne Reliford, hit the ground running sharply at 9pm and waste no time in taking complete control of the room with a subtle yet assertive swing transcending restrictive labels such as jazz, blues, or rock.

This is just good music by good people.

Reliford spellbinds on the keys: instinctual, intelligent fingers imposing a hypnotic pace in which he becomes both the snake charmer and the serpent itself - controlling the threat, but ready to strike at any moment. Meanwhile, Blazer's mellow virtuosity perfectly nurtures each song by creating a balance around Hale's syncopated groove command. The three musicians disappear into each other's talents, scarcely making eye contact despite the complexity of arrangements. It's fantastic - and only going to get better. "Ladies and gentlemen," announces Hale, "put your

hands together for the one and only ... Mac Mcintosh!" The thin frame of tonight's featured singer takes the

stage, launching into Duke Ellington's genre-defining "It Don't Mean a Thing (If It Ain't Got That Swing)."

In a world increasingly reliant on DJs and Spotify playlists to cultivate ambience, this fourpiece manages to maintain freshness in the comparative antiquity of live music, breathing life into a smart selection of largely forgotten standards like Big Joe Turner's "Roll 'em Pete," Billie Holiday's "Good Morning Heartache," and the omni-hit "Fly Me to the Moon."

Just when you get comfortably nestled into a time gone by, Blazer flips from upright bass to his electric five-string and instantly modernizes the entire room.

This is jazz turned every which way but loose. Without missing a beat, they seamlessly roll into the

O'Jays' 1973 commercial monolith "For the Love of Money" -("Money-money-money-monneyyyy/ MUHNAY!") - and the invested audience sings along. This serves as a perfect bridge to one of their own creations, a playful call-and-response mash-up titled "My H-E-B Girl" in which Hale raps about a recurring late-night encounter with a beautiful stranger over the melody of Roberta Flack's "I Feel Like Making Love." The crowd buys in and follows Hale's direction to sing along.

Exercising expert showmanship and timing, the band moves to call it a night, but the audience won't have it. Mcintosh reclaims the mic for one more song and they cleverly dial it down with Judy Garland's signature "Somewhere Over the Rainbow." Not only does this perfectly summarize the musical trip to Oz and back that these fine musicians have just taken me on, it heartily reminds me that when you live in an incredible city like Austin, there truly is no place like home. 




