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

Is Austin Energy Committed to Sustainability and **Affordability? Its Rate Proposal Raises Doubts.**

Austin Energy's rate increase proposal should shock many in the Austin community.

For years, Austin Energy has embraced energy conservation as key to sustainability and affordability for customers. In addition to running energy efficiency incentive programs, the utility adopted tiered rates for residential customers that charged more per kilowatt-hour for those using more energy. These tiered rates send a clear message to customers: You can significantly reduce your bill by using less electricity.

The current rate structure has been effective. Average electricity usage has declined, leading to monthly bills that are among the lowest in the state - even if our rates aren't. BY KAIBA

The rate increase proposal threatens to upend that success.

Austin Energy wants to more than double the fixed fee everyone pays regardless of how much electricity they consume. It also wants to overhaul its tiered pricing structure, raising rates for customers who consume the least energy and lowering them for those who consume more. Combine the proposed new fixed fee with the proposed new pricing structure, and the result is the people who use the most no longer have as much incentive to conserve and those who use less are disproportionately shouldering the burden of the rate hike.

This is a shocking proposal, especially considering Austin's ongoing affordability challenges and the city's previously stated goals to address the climate crisis.

Austin Energy has also proposed a new Value of Solar tariff, an alternative to net metering designed to fairly compensate customers for excess energy generated by solar panels installed at their homes or businesses. While the new tariff would be a slight increase in the first year, it would change - potentially by a lot - each year. The new tariff also doesn't accurately reflect the benefits that rooftop solar provides to the utility and our community. A volatile Value of Solar rate, or one that undervalues local solar energy, could put the brakes on adoption of solar at homes and businesses.

Austin Energy's rate proposal likewise reveals that the utility continues to invest in the over-40-year-old coal-burning Fayette Power Plant and asks customers to pay for those costs. This is beyond perplexing, given that the Austin City Council and Austin

Energy have committed to shutting down Austin Energy's portion of the plant. While negotiations with the plant coowner, the Lower Colorado River Authority, to achieve that goal have stalled, that is not an excuse to continue to invest ratepayer money - our money - in an outdated and polluting facility.

All in all, Austin Energy's rate proposal leaves us wondering: Is Austin Energy fully committed to sustainability and affordability? If these are priorities for the Austin City Council, rejecting Austin Energy's proposal and sending the utility back to the drawing board should be an easy decision.

Dear Editor,

News of the *Chronicle*'s sponsored content about mail-order brides recently came to my attention. You rightly pulled the ad and apologized for the content, saying, "Going forward we will not host any mail-order bride sponsored ads..." Great. But if I may, I'd like to go back for a minute.

My hope is that you're not completely unaware of or willfully ignorant to the heightened level of violence the AAPI community has faced since the start of the COVID pandemic. Data from the Center for the Study of Hate and Extremism show that anti-Asian hate crimes increased by 339 percent in 2021. From March of 2020 to December of 2021, Stop AAPI hate received 10,905 reports of hate incidents against AAPI people. A majority of those hate incidents (62%) are reported by women.

However, the underlying violence and aggression towards AAPI persons does not start and stop with the pandemic. Nor does the subjugation of AAPI women, who have long been fetishized and reduced and owned for other people's pleasure. So when we see the ads – or even just stories about them – the messages

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
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
we receive from those posts hit us deeply. And painfully.

What also troubles me is this: What if no one had called you out on those ads in the first place? Would they still have a home on your site or in your paper today? And if there's a slight possibility that the truthful answer to that question is "yes" or even "maybe," then I respectfully request that you go beyond apologies and sensitivity training and indefinite moratoriums on questionable ads. Going forward, I ask that you consistently consider the role your actions have in sending harmful messages that uphold dangerous systems of belief and oppression, and what more you can do to change them.

SCOTUS hobbles EPA, but climate tools remain by LINA FISHER

At the very end of its dismal term, on June 30, the **U.S. Supreme Court** issued a ruling that took away the **Environmental Protection Agency**'s best – but not only - tool for responding to climate change. The legal action brought by the state of West Virginia – a stand-in for all fossil fuel-producing states - successfully challenged requirements under the Clean Power Plan adopted by the Obama administration to shift electric generation away from fossil fuel and toward renewables.

Those regulations were "the most efficient, effective." and lowest-cost way of achieving large quantities of CO2 reductions from the electric power sector," explains Andres Restrepo, a Sierra Club attorney on the case, "That's the way that utilities have always gone as far as reducing emissions from their generation portfolios. With that option off the table, it's just going to be difficult to achieve the same level of curtailment of greenhouse gases. But it doesn't take everything off the table by any means."

The tools remaining in the EPA toolbox include carbon capture and sequestration at gas plants, efficiency improvements, equipment upgrades, and the Clean Air Act's requirement that new energy sources be implemented with the best available emissions controls. Also, there are "certainly other sectors of the economy that are not directly affected by this lawsuit, such as vehicle greenhouse gas emissions or methane emissions from the oil and gas sector, which is something that affects Texas," continues Restrepo. "Texas does deserve credit for all the wind that it's already been capturing, but it is not doing nearly enough to promote [the switch to renewables]. Federal regulations help incentivize the market in a place like Texas to adopt those resources; that's why this decision has less importance for people in states that are already benefiting from the transition to renewable energy more. I do think it's a setback [for Texas]."

However, Restrepo says, local control is not affected by the ruling - "It's not like because of this ruling, the coal and gas

plants in Texas are suddenly able to pollute more today than they did last week before the decision." Austin Energy's Resource, Generation and Climate Protection Plan to 2030, which aims for all generation resources to be carbon-free by 2035, was dealt a recent blow by the failure to close the Fayette Power Project coal plant by 2022, which comprises 80% of AE's emissions and only 15% of its total generating capacity. AE told the Chronicle, "We do not see [the ruling] impacting our generation plan as we are governed at the local level." State law adopted way back in 1999 requires 10% of the state's electricity to come from renewables by 2025; it is unclear how West Virginia v. EPA may affect this goal.

The Sierra Club is troubled by how West Virginia uses the conservative court's "major questions" doctrine - "the clearest exposition of this doctrine that we've seen thus far," says Restrepo. When a federal agency like the EPA plans to issue a regulation with "vast economic and political significance" - as defined by SCOTUS - the court should decide if the statutes authorizing the agency and its programs clearly and unmistakably authorize the action in question.

This doctrine "doesn't give clear guidance [to a judge]. It doesn't set any tests. It's not even clear whether ['vast significance'] is about the price tag associated with the regulation or if it [refers to] transformation of the agency's understood

traditional authority. This decision will probably give the green light to judges in lower courts, who may be skeptical of agency authority, to strike things down that they might not otherwise have done." SCOTUS has already used the major questions doctrine to strike down COVID-related health and safety regulations, including the Centers for Disease Control's eviction moratorium, the Biden administration's proposed vaccine mandate for U.S. workers, and masking requirements on airlines. "This isn't the end of administrative government, but it is going to be a setback," says Restrepo.

Going forward, the Sierra Club's "biggest priority is to see the budget reconciliation bill that's being negotiated in Congress right now passed, [which] would accord hundreds of millions of dollars to renewable energy and environmental justice communities. We are definitely going to push the EPA to issue power plant standards for existing [and new] sources that are as aggressive as possible, supporting them as they tighten the vehicle greenhouse gas standards and oil and gas methane requirements. We have organizers and advocates and attorneys, communicators, lobbyists, volunteers on the ground in all states working at all levels of government, in the [public utility commission] negotiating with utilities, working with state governments to pass new laws and new regulations. We have not by any means put all of our eggs in the EPA basket."

throughout its communities. But let's be real! It's Texas' blue cities, and Austin the bluest among them, that are attracting people to the state, including probably a couple hundred of you reading this now. Greg Abbott didn't do jack! So why is he trying to hurt us so badly?

Unreflective Austin exceptionalism is an ugly look, and population growth in Houston, Dallas/Ft. Worth, and San Antonio is well above that of Texas as a whole, and those places are a hell of a lot more diverse than Austin is, and their futures are not dependent on Austin's goodwill. But that doesn't make untrue that the Austin metro area is growing much faster than all of those places - indeed, faster than any metro area in the country. Is that going to come to

a halt now that people can see the contours of Texas fascism? Dunno! Ask Elon Musk!

EVEN ELON KNOWS WHAT'S UP

More likely, people - even Musk - will see how thoroughly fucked up and broken everything is that Abbott and his supporting cast have touched. Some of that, like voter access or (before last month) abortion care or the state's gobsmackingly impractical refusal to expand Medicaid, is broken on purpose, consistent with some idea of Republican principle. Those principles have all been corroded and eroded down to the studs, though; I'm old enough to remember when "frivolous vigilante lawsuits" were horrific anathema to previous waves of GOP leaders, and when "the state dictating what local schools teach local kids" was the reason why GOP parents

fought to home-school. Now, it's what Greg Abbott says he sincerely believes.

Abbott, who is not a good or nice man, nonetheless retains a measure of gravitas that most of the clowns he has to wrangle, like Ken Paxton or the members of the House Freedom Caucus, have only read about in books. He's the paterfamilias of this third generation of GOP rulers, the lords of misrule. The OGs under George W. Bush were, by definition, a bipartisan crew working within a divided government, and they trimmed their sails accordingly. The long second generation dominated by Perry and his fellow ex-Democrats featured policy initiatives that they'd workshopped over years of public service, not just bullshit they heard Tucker Carlson going on about. This current crew is utterly craven, talentless, and witless

even by comparison to Rick Perry, and the evidence piles up daily. Is the power still on? Will Texas' coddled and cosseted cops save your life or just hang out in the hall outside as you scream? Would kids be better off on the street than in foster care? Will the state health department simply waste a bunch of money ineptly handling disease outbreaks and contact tracing, or will it straight-up give people monkeypox? How is cannabis both legal and illegal at the same time?

And what more do these fools have to ruin and break before Texas turns blue? The latest poll shows not just Abbott, but also Dan Patrick and Ken Paxton, at below 50% and barely 5 points ahead of their challengers. They have 10 weeks to avoid screwing up, which given their track record might as well be 100 years.



Power stayed on (for most) Monday, despite record-breaking energy demand

ERCOT Asked and Texas Listened, and the Power Stayed On

The Electric Reliability Council of Texas' call for energy conservation seemed to work Monday, despite power demand breaking a record for the third time this July. ERCOT was prepared to cut off large industrial consumers, and a worst-case scenario would have meant initiating rolling blackouts, despite Gov. Greg Abbott's continued assurances that the power would stay on. ERCOT asked for conservation again Wednesday and there hadn't been blackouts as of press time for the Chronicle.


Monday afternoon, more than 3,000 houses lost power in East Austin, along with more than 2,000 blacked out in Southwest Austin, according to **Austin Energy**'s outage map. But most of the affected customers got their power back in less than an hour, with all but 100 East Austin homes back to business as usual by 4:30pm.

An ERCOT press release Monday seemed intended to calm Texans' nerves – frayed by the colossal power grid failure during February 2021's **Winter Storm Uri** – and explained that ERCOT had deployed a conservation call more than four dozen times since 2008 to successfully manage grid operations.

Two factors drove strain on the grid: extreme heat leading to record high electric demand, and extremely low **wind generation** – less than 10% of capacity. The city of Austin issued an excessive heat warning lasting until July 12, then extended it until the 13th at 8pm, and endured a 109-degree high on the

11th. Total forecast demand at the tightest time Monday, between 2 and 3pm, was 79,671 megawatts, with 81% of solar, 85% of dispatchable (gas and coal plants), and only 8% of wind power's installed capacity projected to be available. On Wednesday it was 78,451 megawatts, with conservation requested from 2-9pm due to forced thermal outages, solar performing worse at 68% due to cloud cover, dispatchable at 84%, and wind at 12%. An ERCOT spokesperson said that between 1:56 and 2pm Monday, they saw customers take action - nearly 500 MW of load dropped off. Still, the 78,264 MW used set a new unofficial all-time peak demand record and a July peak record (surpassing the previous record set on July 8 with 78,204 MW).

Should demand reach levels that threaten to outpace supply again, ERCOT will again urge customers to set their thermostats to 78 degrees or higher, turn off and unplug nonessential lights and appliances, and consult the Public Utility Commission's website for more conservation tips. A list of city-operated cooling centers at public libraries, senior centers, and rec centers can be found at austintexas.gov/alerts, though most are only open during daylight hours. Should such risk present again, the city's overnight cooling shelters will open dependent upon widespread power outages and estimated time of power restoration. Cap Metro also offers free rides to cooling centers as long as an excessive heat warning is in effect. - Lina Fisher

Neighbors with and without homes collide at Roy Guerrero Park by ABE ASHER

The mood was not joyous in early June, as Southeast Austin residents gathered at the Montopolis Recreation and Community Center to discuss their concerns about an encampment of unhoused people at Roy G. Guerrero Colorado River Metro Park. Staff from Parks and Recreation, Austin Public Health, and the Austin Police Department were on hand to field questions.

One Little League softball coach said that he was stabbed at a park facility in May. Other people spoke of their cars being bro-

ken into, and of vandalism that has left a park concession stand inoperable. Parents said they didn't feel safe bringing their kids to the park. Israel Lopez, president of Montopolis Little League, said that much of his organization's equipment at the park has been stolen or dam-

aged "beyond repair." Animating all of these concerns was a feeling that if the park were located in another neighborhood, the city would never have allowed the encampment at Roy Guerrero to grow large enough to disrupt community programming.

"The location of this particular encampment, from our community perspective, is the logical consequence of city mismanagement and city officials not wanting to address fundamental questions related to equity in our city," said Montopolis community activist Fred McGhee. "There's a reason this encampment is not in Pemberton Heights."

Frustration with the city's handling of homelessness in Southeast Austin has been building for months, among both the housed and unhoused. Many at the encampment, which centers on the final holes of Roy Guerrero's disc golf course, relocated there after being swept from more visible

sites nearby, such as Longhorn Shores or along East Riverside. Robert Reves. a 58-year-old who'as been living in the park for just over five months, said he feels like the city is trying to push him "out of sight."


For community leader Susana Almanza, director of the Eastside environmental group PODER and twice a City Council candidate, the city's decision to sweep encampments along the East Riverside corridor traded one problem for a host of other problems, "There's not as much poverty in

> the city, but it just shifted it further to the outskirts." Almanza said. The East Riverside camps "became a real big eyesore, because [of] everybody from the airport coming up and down those major corridors, and so it was like, 'OK, let's get them out'

were the alternative sites for them to go?

Lopez said the presence of the encampment has affected the communal feel at Little League games. "Families, they don't come out in full families," Lopez said. "It's the mother, father, and the participant, the kid. No grandmothers, no grandfathers come out. It affected us - we can't have a concession stand, you can't go to our complex and watch a game, have a popcorn, have a drink, have a pickle, have a hot dog, you can't do anything because our concession stand is down. You can't go to the restroom ... They're in bad shape."

In a statement provided to the Chronicle, PARD spokesperson Kanya Lyons said that the city has responded to community concerns by taking a more active role in supervising and policing the encampment.

"Efforts are being made to reduce the debris at Roy Guerrero Park with partners including Austin Resource Recovery and non-profit partners," Lyons wrote. "APD is providing additional patrols in this area of town. Security officers have been hired to support security needs at Krieg Fields. This site requires a City-wide effort and continues to be a high priority.'

Council Member Pio Renteria (Almanza's brother), whose district includes the park, was initially present for the community meeting but left halfway through, and was not available to speak with the Chronicle for this story. Almanza agreed the city has been more responsive to community concerns in the aftermath of the June meeting, but said it has not communicated a clear plan to move people living in the encampment to more stable living situations.

This is not the first time that government policy has pushed poor people unable to find housing into the open spaces of Montopolis. In 2019, Gov. Greg Abbott launched a plan to sweep encampments under Austin highways and relocate people to a state-sanctioned camp off of Highway 183 on Montopolis' eastern edge. That site is now Camp Esperanza, managed by The Other Ones Foundation; nobody plays the same role as TOOF at Roy Guerrero.

McGhee noted that people in Montopolis and Southeast Austin with homes have lived for years without major incident alongside those who lack housing. He said that city policies and dramatic cost-of-living increases have made the encampment in the park "overwhelming" and turned it into a public health crisis, as campers try to survive triple-digit temperatures this summer without reliable access to critical resources.

People living in the encampment have, of course, felt the brunt of that inequity. Gina Arellano Robledo Robo, who spent a short period living at a SAFE Alliance shelter, said that living in the park is in some ways "less safe" than living on city streets because of the relative lack of visibility. Robo said that she recently had her tablet and phone stolen, while Reves said that he and his neighbors received better city services at their previous encampment off of Pleasant Valley Road. "They had to keep that area clean," Reyes said. "Back here, they could care less."

Residents of the encampment are also concerned that they will inevitably be forced to move again. Michael Romo, a 27-year-old native of Montopolis, said that while people in the encampment have heard that the city is acquiring hotels to convert into both temporary and permanent housing for those seeking to get off the streets, there is little sense of when anyone might be invited to live elsewhere. "I don't know where we're going to go next." he said.

Another community meeting may be held in mid-August to get a fuller update from city officials on their response to the encampment. For McGhee, what the city needs is a plan to address the root causes of its growing housing crisis. Until it has that, he said, neighborhoods like Montopolis will likely continue to feel the brunt of the pain.

"We are in the process of demolishing, destroying, privatizing, and marketizing our public housing, plus the waitlist for our public housing is thousands of people long," McGhee said. "The city doesn't have a place for these people to go."

CITY HALL GEARS UP FOR \$300M+ HOUSING BOND

Austin voters will likely be asked to approve a new housing bond in November, following the launch of a campaign by housing advocates for a ballot measure to secure a minimum of \$300 million for various affordable housing programs.

In 2018, about **73% of voters** in the city approved a \$250 million housing bond nearly three times larger than prior housing bonds in 2006 and 2013. Nearly all of those funds have been spent or committed, yet Austin's housing crisis is worse than ever. Mayor Steve Adler floated the idea of a new housing bond in January, saying he would support a package between \$300 million and \$500 million. Now, he told the Chronicle, he wants Council to place a bond on the Nov. 8 ballot, "It seems there's considerable and widespread community support," the mayor told us. "And there's certainly a critical need."

Council will vote at the July 28 meeting to ask City Manager Spencer Cronk to prepare an election ordinance. Should the ayes have it, staff will present draft language to Council for approval in mid-August; the deadline to set the November ballot is Aug. 22 (also the filing deadline for this fall's Council elections).

HousingWorks Austin, Foundation Communities, the Austin Justice Coalition, Austin Habitat for Humanity, and The **Other Ones Foundation** have already signed on to a November campaign, with others soon to follow. An upcoming press conference on Thursday, July 21, is likely to serve as the campaign kickoff, with more endorsements on tap. The event is being held at the Jordan at Mueller, a Foundation Communities property funded in part by the 2013 and 2018 housing bonds.

Even a \$500 million bond won't solve Austin's housing crisis, but housing providers can leverage the city's money to produce new below-market-rate housing and preserve existing affordable stock. HousingWorks Austin jointly conducts an ongoing study with the data analytics firm Civic Economics to discern "The Economic Impact of Austin's Affordable Housing Bonds."

The latest impact report, issued last month, concludes that \$122 million in city bond funds spent on new affordable housing since 2013 garnered an additional \$788 million in financing from other sources, which produced a total of 4,372 new units in 43 projects, 3,707 of which are below market rate; 833 of those are permanent supportive housing units. Looking just at projects funding by 2018 bond proceeds, HousingWorks and Civic Economics identified 21 projects either completed or under construction, with 1.712 total units, 96% of which are affordable.

Before advocates can get too excited about a new housing bond, they'll have to contend with the reality check expected to be delivered by Cronk when he presents his proposed fiscal year 2023 budget this Friday, July 15. The city budget office has warned for years of looming budget deficits in the wake of 2019 legislation that sharply limits how much tax revenue cities can raise without seeking voter approval. With the national economy teetering on the edge of recession, and growing pressure to fund a \$22-per-hour minimum wage for city employees (or as close as Council thinks it can get to that), the likelihood of a more austere budget for next vear is even greater. - Austin Sanders

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


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What Is a G File?

Pushing for real police oversight in contract, on ballot

Somewhere deep in the Austin Police Department's computer database sit the personnel files of each of its approximately 1,800 officers. Those files include their disciplinary histories, which may include details about unnecessary violence or unethical conduct, Internal Affairs investigations, and the punishments meted out for misconduct. Most officers won't have much or any disciplinary history. But some, almost certainly, have multiple instances of discipline in their files.

In cases where an officer is suspended, demoted, or fired, the specifics of the case can be obtained through a public information request. But if an officer is instead disciplined internally – counseled, reprimanded, and so on – the details remain secret. They go, metaphorically, into what in Texas is called a "G file."

That's a reference to Subsection (g) of Section 143.089 of the Texas Local Government Code, the snippet of state law establishing this confidential class of information: "the department may not release any information contained in the department file to any agency or person requesting information relating to a ... police officer." The G files contain complaints by citizens, testimony from fellow officers, body-cam video, written reprimands and memos, and other details that justice advocates think should be accessible to the public.

Subsection (g) applies to Texas municipalities whose police officers (or firefighters) are civil service employees – that is, ones that don't have unions that negotiate the terms of officers' employment. Here, the city and the Austin Police Association, through what's called the "meet-and-confer" process, do hash out a contract that could preempt Subsection (g) should the parties so agree. Both APD and APA leadership insist the G file must remain secret – that it will contain frivolous accusations that officers can't defend themselves

against, particularly under Austin's current procedures that allow such claims to be made anonymously. However, during this year's negotiations for a new police contract, the city's Labor Relations Office is proposing to do away with G files. (Neither the city nor APA wished to speak on the record about their positions in the upcoming talks.)

It's easy to guess why City Hall might want to do this, as our community is mired in a years-long police accountability crisis. Since 2019, officers have killed multiple people of color in often fraught circumstances, including Mauris DeSilva, Mike Ramos, and Alex Gonzales. There was also APD's disastrous response to the Black Lives Matter demonstrations of May 2020, when dozens of protesters in front of APD headquarters on Eighth Street were shot with "less lethal" crowd control munitions that nonetheless left many with life-altering injuries. It was the visceral reaction to the Eighth Street shootings that swayed a

unanimous City Council to agree to (slightly) defund APD in the fiscal 2021 budget, cuts that had to be reversed a year later after the Texas Legislature intervened.

We only know what we do about most of APD's most troubling excessive-force cases because Travis County District Attorney José Garza has kept his campaign promise to bring them before a grand jury, which has issued an unprecedented stream of felony indictments against the officers

involved – some more than once. Many of the survivors and families of those killed by police violence have also filed civil suits in which more details have been disclosed. As of this writing, the city has offered more than \$13 million to settle lawsuits brought by Eighth Street shooting survivors, with more likely to come.

But most of what APD knows about these cases – from its Special Investigations Unit and Internal Affairs investigations of these incidents – remains locked up in the G files, because in most cases the department has yet to issue any formal or informal discipline, waiting for the civil and criminal courts to complete their work. The department knows, from the recent examinations of APD's culture by third-party investigators Kroll Associates and the Office of the City Auditor, that some small subset of the department's officers are more aggressive than their peers and are thus an ongoing liability for City Hall.

So the city seems to have come into alignment with justice advocates and against APD and APA brass, agreeing that opening up G files is necessary to change APD's culture. Civil rights activist Kathy Mitchell sums up the rationale: "If officers knew that their violent conduct would be public, and that they would be disciplined for conduct that violates their rules, maybe they would do it less."

OVERSIGHT'S BRIEF HISTORY

Mitchell's organization Just Liberty advocates for criminal justice reform, mostly on a state level, but she's also on the board of Equity Action, a political action committee that came together last year with support from organized labor (other than APA, of course) to oppose the police staffing initiative put on the ballot by Save Austin Now; it has continued its work on local public safety issues. They're also currently directing citizen input about the city budget to City Manager Spencer Cronk

before he releases his proposal for fiscal year 2023 later this week.

Equity Action's members are pleased with the city's negotiating position on G files, but they don't want to wait for the city to try – and probably fail – to get its way in contract talks. Instead, they're gathering signatures to put their own citizen initiative on this November's ballot that would put the fate of APD's G files in voters' hands.

"It's great that the city is proposing this through the current contract negotia-

tion, but the ballot initiative would take that [need] off the table," said Alycia Castillo, Equity Action's treasurer. "So then, what's really a civil rights issue ends up being codified as an ordinance in the city. Then we will have access to police personnel records, even outside of those that are labeled disciplinary, so that the community really gets the transparency that they deserve."

Equity Action has been circulating its petitions since early June and has until September to get 20,000 valid signatures as determined by the city clerk, which it's confident it will. If the proposition does appear on the November ballot, and if it passes, and if it survives potential court challenges, and if it works as intended, it will be a major step toward changing Austin's relationship with its police force.

The city's first meet-and-confer agreement with APA was adopted in 1999, and before then there was no civilian oversight

of APD at all. The city had the same reputation as many others in Texas - as a place where police brutalized poor communities with impunity. That 1999 contract exchanged substantial pay increases for Austin police officers, vaulting them from the lowest- to the highest-paid among Texas' major cities, for the creation of the Office of the Police Monitor and the associated Citizen Review Panel, which proved a disappointment to justice advocates. It had no dedicated funding, was housed within APD, and not only didn't accept anonymous complaints but also required citizens to swear out their affidavits in person.

Although a number of well-respected Austinites served as police monitor - including former City Attorney Iris Jones, now-District Judge Cliff Brown, former Sheriff Margo Frasier, and mayoral policy adviser (among many other things) Ashton Cumberbatch - their gravitas was not enough to transcend the inherent failings of the model, and it didn't avert a continued steady stream of questionable officer-involved shootings. Fast-forward to 2017. when in the wake of the police killings of David Joseph, Morgan Rankins, and Landon Nobles, advocates from many different civil rights organizations banded together - the Austin Justice Coalition, the ACLU of Texas, Just Liberty, Texas Criminal Justice Coalition, Texas Fair Defense Project, Texas Civil Rights Project, Communities of Color United, and Grassroots Leadership.

This coalition successfully pressured City Council to reject the meet-and-confer agreement that had just been negotiated with APA and hold out until the union agreed to real, meaningful citizen oversight. The subsequent city proposal created what is now the Office of Police Oversight, reporting directly to the city manager and designed to meet the needs of the community rather than the desires of APA leaders.

The union did not react well to this. "The Police Association got really upset and they did something foolish," said Chris Harris, director of policy for AJC and also an Equity Action Board member. "They walked away from the negotiations. That reverted them out of the contract" - meaning they defaulted back to regular civil-service rules - "and the result was that they lost millions and millions of dollars." Before the activists got involved, the city had agreed to a contract that increased officer compensation by \$82 million over five years. APA wound up signing a contract 10 months later that gave them \$44.6 million over four years, and still included the new OPO.

The office was charged with collecting complaints against officers, gathering additional information from complainants and

witnesses, and deciding which complaints to forward to APD for investigation by Internal Affairs. The complaints, which could be filed anonymously, were published by OPO on its webpage, greatly increasing the transparency of officers' interactions with the community. Farah Muscadin, the very last person to serve as police monitor, became the director of OPO, reporting directly to Cronk.

"I think really the biggest thing that we got was the anonymous complaints." Harris said, referring to the powers given to OPO in the 2018 contract. "Almost everywhere else in the country, you have to go into a police department and sign a sworn affidavit under the threat of perjury that any complaint you're filing against an officer is true to the best of your knowledge. And of course, that means that there are very, very few complaints that ever get lodged, because people are very intimidated by this process and fear retaliation by police." (This was also true of the complaint process under the Police Monitor system.)

As soon as the OPO was established, APA began filing grievances against the city (which went to arbitration) for violating the terms of the contract, challenging how the office was set up and doing its work. In December 2021, after at least 20 grievances, the union found a challenge that stuck. It argued that OPO's analyses of the complaints - called "preliminary review" by the office - were in fact investigations, forbid-

that's how the OPO is able to say, 'This complaint should be classified for investigation,' as opposed to what APD wants to do, which is always to classify everything to go back to the supervisor and not get investigated." That's how the details of these complaints, and about individual officers, get locked up in the G file.

den under the contract. To conduct their preliminary review, OPO employees contacted complainants to ask for additional information on their complaints, found and interviewed witnesses, and reviewed police investigative materials, like body-cam video and arrest reports. The arbitrator decided that OPO would no longer be allowed to do these things.

"They basically said that the OPO can't investigate," Mitchell said. "And because the word 'investigate' was not defined in the police contract, they applied their own broad, sweeping definition that essentially eliminated the key wins from the last round of contract negotiations. So things like being able to ask questions and get them answered during an IA investigation were eliminated. Or doing their preliminary review, which is really critical, because

"OPO is now very much a weakened entity, back to serving a powerless intake function for complainants, which was why we called for the city to reject the police contract in 2017," Mitchell said. "They can't have any part in investigating, as broadly defined as you can imagine. They can be a scribe. So I walk in and I say, 'This is what happened to me,' and they can transcribe my words into the computer and then ship it to IA. That's it."

THE BALLOT INITIATIVE

The ballot language the advocates are using to gather signatures can be found at equityactionatx.org. It reads: "Shall the voters of Austin adopt an initiated ordinance" - that is, one placed on the ballot by citizens - "that will deter police misconduct and brutality by strengthening the City's system of independent and transparent police oversight?" Equity Action's website also includes the text of the ordinance that will go onto the books if a proposition passes.

Equity Action's members say the primary goal of the ordinance is to counter the damage done to OPO by the police union's grievances. "We're trying to really make clear that the Office of Police Oversight has the ability to gather evidence," Mitchell said. "We want to have civilians – who are city employees – who can really be involved in the investigation process to the point of even gathering evidence, if they need to, to ensure that something is investigated thoroughly.'

Getting rid of G files is also very important. If the initiative is approved and the ordinance works, the public will begin to learn the disciplinary histories of officers like Chance Bretches and Christopher Taylor, both accused of misconduct on multiple occasions before being indicted for their use of excessive force. (Taylor, who killed both Mauris DeSilva and Mike Ramos, is the first APD officer to ever be indicted for murder.) Civil rights advocates are confident that when the public is able to see these disciplinary histories, it will begin to reverse the declining rate of discipline at APD that they've observed since the 2018 contract went into effect.

They say that after the establishment of OPO, as more complaints of officer misconduct rolled in, the type of discipline meted out that would require public disclosure the suspensions, demotions, and fining of officers - did not rise. In fact, it fell. The advocates believe that police leadership is now finding fewer officers guilty of serious

misconduct so that the data from investigations will be stored in G files, shielding the officers' conduct from public view.

"The worst part about G files is that they really incentivize not sustaining misconduct, because then you get to keep it secret," Harris said. "If you have a system set up where only when you find your people did something bad does it come out, it creates this perverse incentive to never find they did anything bad – because then nothing will come out."

To address this dynamic, Equity Action's proposed ordinance requires the chief of police to explain his or her decisions when going against the recommendations of OPO and clearing officers of misconduct. "If the OPO recommends discipline and the chief doesn't do it, the chief would write a memo saying why they disagree with the OPO's recommendation, and that memo would be public," Mitchell said. "So no longer will discipline simply kind of vanish because nobody wants to say out loud, 'What was that? What was going on?""

The proposed ordinance will also give the chief 365 days to rule on allegations of officer misconduct from the day they come to light, instead of the current 180 days. That will help facilitate the work of a little-known police oversight group known as the Community Police Review Commission, which reviews cases of police violence that result in serious bodily injury or death but that go unindicted by the D.A and grand jury. The ballot measure would make the work of the CPRC's volunteer members easier by allowing them to study investigative materials on secure computers at home,

instead of having to meet in city buildings during normal business hours.

Finally, the proposition declares that any police contract negotiated between the city and APA must implement the ordinance as written and that no contract or labor agreement may be made by the city that would allow the police union to file grievances contesting the new rules.

To Mitchell, these are incremental steps, ongoing strategic adjustments, made necessarv by the maneuvering of the police union. "I don't want to say that this is some kind of radical transformation - it's not," she said. "This is just getting us back to having a system for change, a foundation and a staff and a process by which we can identify the things that need to change and then do them one at a time. So this is not radically transformative, it's not going to fix everything. This is a piece of a puzzle. But it's an important piece. That's why the police union grieved it to death. They went full-on attack because what we're building here is a foundation for continued and incremental change. And that's a threat to them."

BACK TO THE CONTRACT

The new police contract is supposed to be finalized by September. But negotiators have an additional six months to craft a deal if they need it, and observers expect they will. That means Equity Action's ordinance could be approved while talks continue.

According to reports from the negotiations now underway, APA is asking for significantly more money in the next contract. Attendees say the union wants a 20% pay increase for its officers, including a 5%

increase each year for officers with four or more years of experience. APA also wants higher longevity pay and larger stipends for officers who develop expertise in particular areas of policing. Advocates estimate that APA is requesting \$60 million to \$80 million for the next four years.


At a recent Equity Action gathering, soon-to-be U.S. Rep. Greg Casar, who on Council led the charge to vote down the 2017 contract, addressed the issue. "The way these things work is the Police Association says, 'If you want some civil rights, you're gonna have to bargain for it.' And they're never going to give up the five or six things that most people want, even if you have 70% or 80% of people agreeing, even if you had the entire City Council agree. The way it's structured, the Police Association would be, 'Well, that's \$10 million more, that's \$20 million more.' And you eventually can't get it. So figuring out how to pay the Police Association for basic civil rights, it's just a messed-up system."

Casar is enthusiastic about Equity Action's ballot initiative because it turns this dynamic upside down. It gets police oversight into the contract by forbidding Council from approving any agreement that undermines it. So if voters approve the ordinance, it will set up a game of chicken between justice advocates and the police union. It will come down to which side can hold out longer; as long as the city and APA are unable to agree to a new contract, both sides will suffer. Police officers will go without the raises they want; advocates will be unable to move forward on oversight.

Harris said advocates are prepared to wait out APA, just as they did before, but don't really believe the union will make the same mistake twice. "We understand that the Police Association walking away from the contract process is a potential outcome," Harris said. "But we don't think it's likely because they gain a lot more funding with the contract. We think they lose more without it than we do."

Casar told his fellow justice advocates at the Equity Action gathering that the group's initiative is the only way to bring effective police oversight to Austin – that only the will of the voters can fix the broken system of police unions compelling citizens to bargain for civil rights. He said the strategy could be a template for other communities to follow.

"The most obvious reason we all do this work is it will help so many people in this community who never see justice," Casar said. "It will help their families. It will save lives that we don't even know we are saving. Because when there is accountability and transparency and oversight, then we know the things that are happening in our community, especially to the poorest people, who we may never hear from, who may never complain."



On the Hunt for Lia Park and the Missing Jewel

Austin author Jenna Yoon hopes to bring more diversity to YA fantasy with her debut novel

Jenna Yoon stopped writing when she was in third grade. Any hopes she'd had of becoming an author were crushed after her teacher wrongfully accused her of plagiarizing an original story she had worked on. It was decades later that she was able to create

again, but now she's not only writing again, this summer the Austin author has had her first novel, a magical young adult adventure, published by Simon & Schuster's Aladdin imprint.

Lia Park and the Missing Jewel is the first in a planned series about Lia, a Korean American 12-year-old who goes on a journey to retrieve an ancient family jewel to save her parents from an evil spirit. The story combines parts of Korean mythology with magic, spies, and familial values, focusing on Lia's adventures in Korea.

Yoon, who herself traveled between the United States and Korea for most of her school and college life, said she wanted to capture parts of her heritage and her own struggle balancing both parts of her identity. Growing up in America, she said, "I didn't see myself in books, and honestly, I

don't think I ever questioned it. As a child, I just thought, 'Well, there's a lot more white people' - until I moved to Korea when I was in eighth grade. ... There was a bit of a culture shock but then also I started to realize, 'Hey, everyone here is Korean!"

After moving back to the U.S. for her undergraduate degree from Welleslev College, Yoon noticed a severe lack of Korean history and awareness, and so returned to South Korea to study Korean art history at Ewha Womans University

in Seoul. She said she moved with the intent of becoming a professor, but her plans changed shortly after she finished her master's. She came back to the States and studied early education before becoming a teacher. However, she was still reluctant to believe she could write a book. "I thought, first of all, all the authors were white. So if I wanted to write a book, it wouldn't sell with my Asian face and I would probably need to use a pen name."

had her first daughter, and then a miscarriage, that she began writing again. "These moments often make you think about things, and for me, writing became sort of a healing process," Yoon said. She became pregnant again, and this is when she really started work on what would become Lia Park's first adventure. Unlike many

women who rest and relax throughout their pregnancies, Yoon took the opportunity to really make those months count. Setting a strict deadline, she promised, and succeeded, in finishing her novel by the time she had her second child. "My

When she received her first copy of the book, Yoon said she felt a bit frightened at the prospect of so many people reading her work. But she said her daughter's pride is what motivated her the most. "It felt surreal when [my daughter] started first grade and she went to school and some older girls, maybe in third or fourth grade, told her, 'We know your mom, your mom wrote this book and we love this book and we love you too!' So they're now her new best friends and when she comes home she tells me about it. I can see there's a lot of pride in her eyes."

Yoon said she hopes her writing will bring more diversity into the world for her daughter, where everyone can read about and have a fun adventure with Lia Park. Unlike her own experiences as a child, she doesn't want anything to make her daughter lose the ability to have big aspirations. "I want her to feel that nothing is stopping her from becoming whatever she wants to become. There won't be any barriers because she's Asian," Yoon said. "I want my daughter to dream big."

Review: Disney's Newsies

THE BROADWAY STRIKE MUSICAL OCCUPIES ZILKER HILLSIDE THEATRE SPECTACULARLY BY BOB ABELMAN

In the late 19th century, newspaper moguls Joseph Pulitzer and William Randolph Hearst went to great lengths and new depths to outsell each other in a cutthroat media landscape. They perfected the craft of hyping headlines, spinning stories. and creating fake news for their New York Citybased papers, figuring that it was more profitable to entertain and astound than inform.

Disney musicals tend to embrace the very same model for success.

Take Newsies, which premiered on Broadway in 2012 and is currently being staged by Zilker Theatre Productions. It tells the tale of charismatic Jack Kelly (LJ Salinas), the leader of a ragged band of teenage newsboys and - in this production - newsgirls, who dreams of a better life far from the hardship of the city streets. But when publishing titan Pulitzer (Scott Shipman) raises distribution prices at the newsies' expense, Jack finds a cause for which to fight. With the help of his self-actualizing sidekick Davey (Morgan Whitley) and the tenacious Katherine (Abigail Bensman), who is a first-act renegade reporter and second-act love interest, they rally newsies from the five boroughs to strike for what's right.

Based on the real-life newsboy strike of 1899, but unlike other rippedfrom-the-headlines musicals like Come From Away, Newsies leaves the history lesson to others and replaces it with huge production numbers driven by dynamic anthems like "Seize the Day" and "The World Will Know."

So much so that when Governor Teddy Roosevelt (Matt Connely) makes an eleventh-hour entrance, he says to Pulitzer, "Well Joe, don't just stand there letting these children sing – endlessly."

Once you get past the production numbers, with their captivating choreography and Alan Menken and Jack Feldman's dazzling Tony Award-winning score, what's left is Harvey Fierstein's predictable storyline, cliche-driven dialogue, and an abundance of Disneyesque theatricality that earned no awards. Every situation facing the newsies is dramatic and dire, every dire situation leads to a speech about brotherhood, and every inspiring speech builds to a rousing song and an extended dance break.

Fortunately, after 54 musicals across 63 seasons, song and dance are right in the wheelhouse of Zilker Theatre Productions' outdoor musical ventures. So, the litmus test for this one is whether the talent on stage - under Joey Banks' direction and with the accompaniment of a fantastic 10-piece orchestra with Beth Everett at the helm - can sell these goods with the same charm and moxie that their characters sell theirs.

Yes, they can. And, on opening night, they did so amidst a heat wave that broiled the stage and hillside seating. With temperatures still at 93 degrees at intermission, Teresa Carson's layered period costuming looked great but was likely no friend to the cast.

The casting of the newsies must have occurred at Costco, for there are more performers than you really need. Yet, every one of them offers a distinctive, thoroughly endearing character and radiates youthful energy and enthusiasm. The ensemble fills the double-wide stage with waves of pitch-perfect sound (nicely balanced by designer Rodd Simonsen) and Chris Shin's choreography,

which pays significant homage to the iconic moves - the gazelle-like leaps, the blending of ballet and in-vour-face athleticism, the defiant poses - found in the original work. When called upon, dance captains Evan Carlson and Ella Grace Harper perform the more technically complicated maneuvers with immense grace and precision, and they blend

in during the wonderful moments of all-for-one/ one-for-all synchronization. Set changes are perfectly orchestrated as well.

This show also boasts fine acting from the starring and supporting players already mentioned, but also from Veronica Merrick, as Pulitzer's opinionated secretary Hannah, and Danielle Kaigler, as the belting burlesque queen Medda Larkin, Katie Stumpf, as Davey's little brother, Les, nearly steals the show with her wise guy jr. precociousness and exceptional dance skills.

Designer Joshua Denning forgoes the scenic rear projections and metal scaffolding centerpiece employed in the Broadway and touring shows. Instead, three mobile flights of stairs against a backdrop of unimpressive faux-brick and steel inner-city building facades fill the stage, which are made more attractive once the sun sets and Rachel Atkinson's dramatic lighting design kicks in.

This terrific production is free to the public, but consider dropping some cash in the donation buckets on your way out. There's a ton of newsies in need of rehydration.

DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Kerrville-Schreiner Park encompasses a scenic stretch of the Guadalupe River on the edge of Kerrville. A former state park, the city park offers year-round recreational opportunities, but in the summer it really shines.

The small lake on the river is relatively shallow and the water is cold. Colorful **floats** are the implements of choice for a respite from the heat. There isn't a beach in the park, unless you count the boat ramp where rented kayaks are launched. Most of the shore is lined with a retaining wall, which offers easy access to the water.

With more than 235 campsites, mini-cabins, and RV slots, many visitors come to K-S Park to spend the night under the stars. There is even a three-bedroom ranch house for rent with all the modern conveniences and nature right outside the door.

The Bandera Highway (TX-173) slices the River Side portion of the park from the **Hill Side**, the larger section.

Pecan Loop, a campground in a pecan grove on the River Side, is a personal favorite. Eight of the 23 mini-cabins are on the river bank. These small shelters have the advantage of heat and air conditioning, but you'll need to bring your bedding for the bunk beds.

Camping in the Hill Side section has the advantage of easy access to the nearly 11 miles of hike and bike trails that range



from easy to steep and difficult. A 6-mile paved trail runs along the river from the park to the center of town.

Kerrville-Schreiner Park is at 2385 Bandera Highway in Kerrville. The area was developed as a state park by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1937, and was transferred to the city in 2004.

For the first time in club history, Austin FC has an MLS All-Star in **Sebastián Driussi**. *¡Felicidades!* Well deserved. Problem is, the Verde and Black should have multiple representatives on the All-Star squad come August. And they know it.

"We're sitting at the top right right now and I think we should for sure have more than one player," **Julio Cascante** said. He, **Ruben Gabrielsen**, **Diego Fagúndez**, **Alex Ring**, and **Brad Stuver** all have compelling cases as All-Star snubs.

Because here's a simple fact of life as we sit in July 2022: Austin FC is a really good team. Excellent? Yeah. Dominant? Often. Beatable? Not lately. On Tuesday the club conceded an early goal to the visiting **Houston Dynamo** and, like a pissed-off hornet, stung back three times to win its fourth straight match and ascend to the top of the league table.

Conjure up your ideal recipe for a title-contending soccer team. What ingredients did you pick? Potent, attractive attack? Reliable defense and goalkeeping? Solid veteran leadership? Innovative hotshot head coach? MVP candidate pulling the strings?

Welcome to Verde. It's all right there.

There are only so many ways to win a soccer match, and the Oaks have covered most of them through 20 games. They wasted no time crossing off "merciless, unmitigated beatdown" with the first two matches of the season, then circled back to it last week in Atlanta in case any ink had started to fade. "Gritty, grind-it-out nailbiter"? How about a pair of 1-0 road wins last month in Montréal and Charlotte, the former coming despite an early red card. "Improbable comeback"? July 4: turning 0-2 into 3-2 in Colorado City. "Big win over fellow contender"? May 18: 2-1 over former league leaders LAFC. These Oaks have hit for the cycle, and done so with over 40% of the regular season still to come.

The scary part is that Austin FC is doing all of this shorthanded. **Cecilio Domínguez**, one of just three permitted top-dollar players, isn't playing, and there are no signs suggesting he will again this season, at least for Austin. The club's starting right wing has become a platoon between 31-year-old **Ethan Finlay** and 17-year-old **Owen Wolff** and yet, somehow, it's worked. And then there's the part that will make Verde fans' mouths water: The cavalry is still on the way.

The midseason transfer window is here. and Austin FC has already reeled in its first fish: twitchy winger Washington Corozo, eager to prove his mettle and earn a World Cup trip with Ecuador by impressing stateside. Coach Josh Wolff has all but confirmed the club will add fullback depth, now more urgent than ever after **Hector Jimenez** left Tuesday's match on a stretcher (groin injury, Wolff posited). There are even multiple reports of an impending Designated Playersigning centered around Argentine winger Emiliano Rigoni, which would provide a huge lift for the club and also likely necessitate Domínguez leaving Austin FC in an official capacity.

The fact that Austin FC is in the position it's in – atop the table in mid-July and pushing to get stronger – is a credit, first and foremost, to its second-year head coach. "Josh deserved a lot more love last year. I know that he took a lot of criticism and a lot of heat for the results that we were taking last year, but he really was building something from the ground up," Stuver said.

"So a lot of credit goes to Josh and a lot of credit goes to the coaching staff here for building the identity of this club last year, taking the criticism and sticking true to what they believed, bringing in the players that they needed to, and for all of us to buy in again this year and just bring it to life."



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Evil Under the Croatian Sun

Sweat-dripping drama Murina finds tension in the tiniest details by trace sauveur

Murina begins under the water. Within the serene hush of the Adriatic Sea, father Ante (Lučev) and daughter Julija (Filipović) slowly swim into view, diving deep below the surface, spearfishing for the moray eels that give the film its title. The two return to the surface before long, though we return to the depths plenty before the film's end; Julija is an adept diver surrounded by a beautiful sea, and she seems to find comfort in the water. Perhaps it's where she feels the greatest sense of escape from the domineering and abusive Ante, who belittles and commands her in private and in public, including in front of the aware yet complicit mother Nela (Curcic). This familial tension is the bedrock of the story as Ante keeps his daughter in check during a visit from an old friend of his, and an old romantic flame of Nela's, Javier – a rich land developer who may be interested in making a deal with Ante for his slice of paradise.

This sunny, oceanic idyll is the perfect backdrop for the power plays and subtle turns of tension that are exchanged between this group. Ante openly derides his daughter, who is being pushed further and further to the edge, or more specifically, toward Javier, who treats her with more respect than she's ever had from a male figure. Nela has to tell Julija

to stop looking at him like she's in love - to keep her from getting in trouble with her father or because Nela has an underlying sense of jealousy? Each character begins to cautiously needle each other as ideological conflicts and personal vested interests begin to clash. Underneath the allure of the setting is a

buzzing, tangible sense of thorny, sensual anxiety that consistently keeps you on your toes.

Director and co-writer (with Frank Graziano) Antoneta Alamat Kusijanović carries the piece with a staggering confidence for a debut feature. Though it has familiar remnants of this type of subdued drama, Kusijanović never

lets it fall into cliche or predictability. She turns the smallest of actions into the most momentous of turns for her characters. She is also generous in allowing her actors to breathe so much life into the film, every one offering enough dramatic heft within just a

> facial expression to fill in any stray holes within the spartan premise. Filipović is downright revelatory in the way she treats her character's measured yet tangible rebellion against the patriarchal systems that want to keep her stagnant. If the film never finds the release it seems to be building toward, that's only

indicative of the deliberate self-discipline in toeing some taut thematic tightropes. Looking at the world around us, this is the perfect summer drama for a society that continually proves itself more and more obsessed with controlling women.

BOTH SIDES OF THE BLADE

D: Claire Denis: with Juliette Binoche. Vincent Lindon. Grégoire Colin, Bulle Ogier, Issa Perica. (NR, 116 min., subtitled)

Walking into her Paris office one day, Sara (Binoche) spies her ex-lover François (Colin), riding off on his motorcycle. The effect on Sara is immediate, an emotional lightning strike which leaves her reeling. And with that, the knife is unsheathed in Both Sides of the Blade (Avec amour et acharnement), the latest from filmmaker Denis, her second collaboration (after 2017's Let the Sunshine In) with provocative French writer Christine Angot. The two are well matched in this adaptation of Angot's novel Un tournant de la vie, as the author's raw examinations of the human heart mixed with Denis' lyrical, sensual images create a complex stew of emotional turbulence.

Having two powerhouse actors as the leads doesn't hurt, either. Binoche is holding steady at the top of her game, and is utterly fearless as Sara, a woman torn between the past and the present. Equally, Vincent Lindon juggles tenderness, humility, and menace with such an uncanny ease, his unpredictability enhances what is already a steadily restless film. Lindon is Sara's current boyfriend, Jean, an ex-con trying to get back on his feet after a 10-year stint in prison. Jean and Sara have a gentle, passionate relationship until Sara catches that glimpse of François. For not only were Sara and François previously entwined in a mercurial affaire de cœur, ex-rugby player Jean used to work for Francois' company. scouting up-and-coming athletes. It is implied (Denis has never been very interested in explaining things) that Jean ended up in prison because of François, and now François has returned to Paris, wanting Jean to work for him again, while Sara grapples with her increasingly volatile state of mind as she oscillates between the two men. Add to that Jean's son Marcus (Perica) from his previous marriage, who is flunking out of high school and hanging with the wrong crowd: a father's fear of losing his son, as he attempts to prevent his lover from slipping away.

As a catalyst, François remains an enigma for much of the film, an imposing presence because of his absence. When he does step out of the background in the last third, it is a bit lackluster, if only for the passing thought of "This is the guy?!" But the heart wants what the heart wants, unless it's Sara's heart, which wants everything and nothing. Or something completely different, Human beings can be really complicated. And thankfully, there are filmmakers around like Claire Denis who make films such as Both Sides of the Blade to remind us of that complexity. Films that seemingly help us in trying to understand each other, but really show us that we might never be able to. Once again, it's complicated. Denis, Angot, and co. aren't merely mapping out a love triangle here, they're wading around in fractal geometry.

GABBY GIFFORDS WON'T BACK DOWN

Gabby Giffords was talkative, articulate, and naturally persuasive, until she wasn't.

The U.S. representative from Arizona was shot in the brain at a "Congress on Your Corner" event she was holding at a Tucson-area grocery store on Jan. 8, 2011. Six people died in the incident, including federal Judge John Roll and 9-year-old Christina-Taylor Green. That's where directors Julie Cohen and Betsy West (experts in era-defining women, having Julia Child in *Julia* and Ruth Bader Ginsburg in *RBG*) pick up the story.

Hours after the tragedy, NPR had confirmed Giffords' death, and the nation, along with her husband, retired astronaut Sen. Mark Kelly, had begun the mourning process. But against tremendous odds, Giffords underwent brain surgery and survived. Cohen and West guide viewers through Giffords' road to recovery as she suffers from aphasia, an illness that inhibits the ability to transform thoughts into words.

Enhancing the beauty, pain, and remarkable perseverance of Giffords' experience, Kelly took videos of his wife starting day one after her injury. The archival footage is intimate, showing Giffords in physical, speech, and even music therapy, where she cannot form the words to "Happy Birthday." Yet in a video from years later, we see Giffords belting the song at her own birthday dinner, shining with charisma, surrounded by family and friends.

Expertly woven through Giffords' personal story is a comprehensive political commentary on the need for heightened background checks for gun purchasers. Clips from mass shootings from 2011 through to the film's debut at this year's South by Southwest, accompanied by former President Barack Obama's account of the devastation, elevate the film's historical and societal impact.

Gabby Giffords Won't Back Down is a film about grit. It's a film about feminism, change-making, and defying adversity. Even pre-incident, Gabby Giffords' life – her unlikely rise to politics and marriage to an astronaut

was documentary-worthy. But this film represents more than a politician's success story:
 It embodies grief, dignity, and above all, love.

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DRAFTHOUSE VERSUS DRAFTHOUSE UNITED

Alamo South Lamar cinema sees a fight over unionization by RICHARD WHITTAKER

Tensions between workers and management at the Alamo South Lamar – the flagship location of the Alamo Drafthouse chain – reached new highs last week as union organizers with Drafthouse United organized a walkout. The union has now claimed that one of the organizers was fired in retaliation for the protest.

A little after 3:30pm on July 5, the Drafthouse United Twitter account announced that the June 30 deadline they had set for management to give raises that would provide staff with a living wage "or at least be provided a clear plan of action" had passed without clear response. As a result, staff would be walking out (later they clarified this was a sick-out) and requested that customers who held tickets for screenings that night request a rain check. The following day, server Simon Ingrand was fired after management claimed he used a company database to get employee contact information to organize the walkout - a claim he denies. (At press time, the Alamo had not issued any comment on either the union or his firing.)

The Drafthouse unionization effort began last year when staff reached out to the Austin chapter of the Industrial Workers of the World, and they officially announced their decision to form a union in February of this year. Zach "Corpse" Corpstein, a Drafthouse United organizer and server since 2017, estimated that roughly two-thirds of the roughly 130 staff at South Lamar have joined. However, the Drafthouse has as yet not voluntarily recognized the union, and Drafthouse United is not actively seeking a National Labor Relations Board-held election to require recognition. "In our eyes, it gives the bosses more time to strategize or union bust," said Corpstein, who added that staff who participated in the sick-out have faced disciplinary action.

Drafthouse United has said the Alamo management has been engaging in informal and small group meetings with staff rather than talking

directly with the union organizers. Katie Ward, a part-time server at Alamo South Lamar and Drafthouse United Organizing Committee member, said, "Every month or so, a member of management will offer to host a private meeting limited to certain staff members to hear complaints. Although some of those staff members are public members of the union, these were not union negotiation meetings and they did almost nothing to improve the working conditions."

Initially, the union was requesting discussions with management on a wide slate of employment issues, including staffing levels and the decision - after South Lamar reopened in 2021 - to have servers pool tips. However, over time the group refocused on wages, with Drafthouse United requesting a \$4-\$5 per hour immediate raise at all levels. Corpstein noted that the union had "weighed the pros and cons" of moving away from tip pooling, "but it would be a lot of red tape to get that restructured," so they concentrated on using base pay as a way to improve take-home salaries and tackle how understaffed they are, which he referred to as "anywhere between 'desperately' to 'badly."

The union proposes a \$20-per-hour minimum wage for salaried employees, rising to a starting salary of \$26 per hour for supervisors. As for employees who are part of the tip pool, their target is \$6 per hour for new servers, rising to \$8 per hour for experienced staff. Ward said last week's action came after months of promises of pay restructuring from the corporate offices, and Corpstein noted that the problem seems to be the new corporate management in place since founder Tim League stepped down as CEO in 2020, to be replaced by former Starbucks executive Shelli Taylor, and the 2021 sale of the chain to existing majority shareholder Altamont Capital Management and new investor Fortress Investment Group LLC.

especially when the titular role of the sweet London cleaning lady with French designer dreams is performed by Lesley Manville, A reliable collaborator in British filmmaker Mike Leigh's working-class dramas over the years, her most prominent (and Oscar-nominated) role to date in Phantom Thread five years ago strangely foretold this more endearing character in yet another film about the allure of haute couture.

The script is based on a cherished 1958 novel by Paul Gallico, the first book in a series chronicling the global adventures of his Cockney charwoman, with the dropped "H" in her surname restored to the title here in keeping with a more mainstreamed character. Rather than settle into 1950s middle-class complacency after her husband's death in the waning years of World War II, the unassuming Mrs. H decides to do something extraordinary, and perhaps foolish, for a woman of her limited means: Go to the House of Dior in Paris and purchase an evening gown with the guid she's obsessively saved through various means for this sole purpose. Of course, she predictably encounters snobbery in this quest for elegance (Huppert's barely humanized salon manager is a featured villain), but this determined dreamer eventually wins over her detractors and even inspires the Parisian couturier's democratized transition to a prêt-à-porter fashion line. Not a bad day's work for someone who scratches out a living dusting shelves.

Though the movie delivers its chuckles and elicits its sighs in a calibrated narrative arc that softens the hard edges of its late bloomer's life, it would be shortsighted to hastily dismiss Mrs. Harris Goes to Paris as sentimental escapist fare that quickly evaporates into the ether of silly romanticism. Manville's nuanced emotional inflections as a long-invisible human being who simply wants the world to see her, just once, linger in their simple honesty, hitching the film to a heartbound reality in contradiction to the unreality of a fanciful fable with a flip nod toward Sartrean philosophy. In meta fashion, this may be the movie that finally makes the inestimable Manville - now front and center – deservedly visible for the first time in her career. How's that for a happy ending? ***1 - Steve Davis

PAWS OF FURY: THE LEGEND OF HANK

Just how many licks would it take for a cat to get to the center of a Tootsie Pop? Probably just as many pop culture references as are packed into Paws of Fury: The Legend of Hank, because let me tell you, there are dozens. There are so many in here. I was like Erik Voss and his minions trying to write them all down for a New Rockstars movie recap video.

In Paws of Fury, young pup Hank (Cera) has always dreamed of being a samurai. He has left his land in search of a sensei and ends up in

the land of cats, in a village called Kakamucho (*wink*). The various villagers all hate Hank on sight and tell him to scram, Ika Chu (Gervais), a kind of daimyo and the baddie, is building a new palace to honor Shogun (Brooks), Ika Chu hates Kakamucho because he says it ruins his perfect view, so he wants it destroyed. He hires Hank to be the "samurai" and sends him down to "protect" the village. You see where this is going, right? Hank has no idea how to be a samurai, so he asks Jimbo (Jackson), a past-his-prime cat who is hopped up on catnip juice, to help train him. He promptly tells Hank to get his monkey-fighting cocker spaniel self out of his Monday to Friday house. Well, okay, he doesn't say exactly that, but there is that joke later in the movie.

I'll be honest, I went into this thinking, 'Oh boy, this will be a chore.' I shouldn't have, because the first six months of the year have brought some good animated films: The Bad Guys, The Bob's Burgers Movie, and even Minions: The Rise of Gru (words I never thought I would write). Kids will enjoy this, too, and they'll come out with the message that we shouldn't hate the "other," no matter what they look like. Paws of Fury: The Legend of Hank is just straight-up fun, especially for adults. The pop culture references abound. From West Side Story, My Neighbor Totoro, and Godzilla to Star Wars, Jurassic Park, and Friday the 13th Part 2, it's all in there.

Look, when Mel Brooks is both a producer and star of your film, you know it'll have some laughs. The film started as an idea back in 2010, inspired by Blazing Saddles (Brooks also gets an "original writer" credit here), and at one point, it was even titled Blazing Samurai. You also know you're going to get every joke for which the the Young Frankenstein genius is famous. Brooks is a national treasure, and it makes me happy to see him still working at 96. - Sarah Jane

WHERE THE CRAWDADS SING

D: Olivia Newman: with Daisy Edgar-Jones, Taylor John Smith, Harris Dickinson, Michael Hyatt, Sterling Macer Jr.. (PG-13, 125 min.)

Where the Crawdads Sing, the big-screen adaptation of Delia Owens' 2018 novel, wants to slip back into an era where Nicholas Sparks reigned supreme and women rushed to the theatre to sob into tissues as they watched love conquer all obstacles. In the case of this film, the lovers we are destined to root for are Kya (Edgar-Jones) and the sweet boy who taught her to read, Tate Walker (Smith). It's a saccharine relationship, built around the helplessness of a young woman and the stability of a kind young man, a classic pairing that's a bit dated in the 2020s.

The film's central issue is a love triangle that lacks all the smoldering ingredients to create tension and yearning. The minute the second



love interest, Chase Andrews (Dickinson), struts on screen, you can tell he's a villain his slicked-back hair, clean-cut look, and shiny speedboat all feed into his Proud Boy energy. Chase even uses Kya's demeaning town nickname as a term of endearment, calling her "Marsh Girl" like it's a sweet epithet. His horrid nature certainly makes it easy for the audience to side with Kya during the trial of his death, but leaves one puzzled as to why she ever got involved with this man to begin with.

Where the Crawdads Sing falls prey to many period piece tropes, particularly "Black parental figures play savior to a young white girl." It's not a knock on Michael Hyatt's and Sterling Macer Jr.'s performances as kindly store owners Jumpin and Mabel, both of which serve the movie fine enough, but the cliche is clunky. In addition, discussions surrounding sex in the film are comical, like when Tate refuses to sleep with Kya because it wouldn't be right to potentially leave her with a baby before he heads off to college. What was meant to be responsible and genuine only serves as a reminder that abortion is once again illegal in many states in the South.

The only redeeming quality about Where the Crawdads Sing is Edgar-Jones. Her performance here is akin to her breakout role as Marianne in the miniseries Normal People - there's a sweetness within her eyes that's magnetic. It's so easy to watch Edgar-Jones fall in love on screen that it helps propel the movie a little bit, even when the men she's falling in love with are cardboard cutouts (neither of these men have the same intense sensitivity of Paul Mescal as Marianne's love interest, Connell). Edgar-Jones' easygoing allure isn't enough to bind Where the Crawdads Sing together, though, leaving the film a generic, dull outing.



Revolution in the Cinema

AFS celebrates culturedefving movies with Film as a Subversive Art

Lars Nilsen still remembers the first time he held a copy of Amos Vogel's Film as a Subversive Art. It was 1993, and he was working in the Strand Bookstore at 12th and Broadway in New York. The cover, a still from 1971 Yugoslavian erotic political thesis W.R.: Mysteries of the Organism. merely hinted at the contents: articles about and stills from over 600 films, all intriguing outsiders to mainstream cinema. Nilsen, with trademarked self-effacing humor, said, "I remember [being] not only drawn into the book, not only drawn into the films, but drawn into the idea of being a pain in the ass film-type intellectual. It's very seductive."


Growing up in Oklahoma meant the odds of a print copy of this rare and prized volume making its way into the hands of Jazmyne Moreno were long, but she stumbled across a PDF on an online forum. "It seemed like something I had to read," she said, and it filled a gap in her ongoing film education, away from the centers of cinema. "There was

nobody to say, 'You should read this, you should watch this,' so it had to come from somewhere."

Now both have channeled the education within its pages into careers as programmers at AFS Cinema, and are reciprocating its influence with Film as a Subversive Art, an eight-film series running all July that Nilsen described as a tribute not just to the book but "to Vogel's generation of film programmers who were going in and seeking out films that were subversive on their own merits."

Vogel is arguably the forefather of American

arthouse film bookers. Born in Vienna. Austria. in 1921, he fled from the Nazis in 1938, and in 1947 he founded the seminal Cinema 16 film club in New York. Inspired by the cinema clubs of Europe that specialized in dissident, avant-garde, and experimental films, for 17 years he and his wife, Marcia, introduced American audiences to a whole wave of bleeding-edge filmmakers, from Agnès Varda to John Cassavetes to Stan Brakhage, Yasujirō Ozu, Richard Lester, and more. In doing so he also helped formalize the idea of a film programmer,



and his approach to curation is still influential. "Most of what we do, we take from him," said Moreno. "The idea of film as high culture comes from Vogel and his generation."

In 1963 Vogel transferred that booking expertise when he co-founded the New York Film Festival, while his encyclopedic knowledge was laid down in 1974 in Film as a Subversive Art, a guide to transgressive movies - not in some simplistic exploitation fashion, but in forcing society to reexamine

norms. Nilsen said. "It wasn't just, 'Oh, it's shaking up people at the cocktail party.' These were shaking up governments or shaking up cultures."

Every reprinting seems to spark another round of programming inspired by Vogel's work. With a new edition (the first since 2005) by Film Desk Books on the racks, this time it's AFS Cinema's turn. The series began last weekend with Le Révélateur, Philippe Garrel's 1968 experimental portrait of a family, and continues this week with Coming Apart (1969), starring Rip Torn in

a proto-found-footage psychosexual drama. The season continues with Birds, Orphans and Fools (1969), Juraj Jakubisko's searing commentary on the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia, before wrapping up with a landmark depiction of female sexuality in cinema, 1932's Ecstasy.

Copies of the new edition of Vogel's work will be available for purchase at all screenings. "It's a perfect facsimile edition," Nilsen said, "and it still works. People are drawn not only into the book but into that world of being a subversive film enthusiast."

More Than a Chance in Hell: THE CASEY'S NEW ORLEANS **SNOWBALLS STORY**

Considering the local frozen treat that helps to sweetly beat the heat by wayne alan Brenner

What's the difference, really? Between a so-called snowball and most of the other frozen-water confections that are available from trucks and trailers and more permanent structures all over this city in our hottest months? Isn't it all just ice, ice, baby?

"The difference is in how it's made," says Mars Chapman, the man who owns and runs Casey's New Orleans Snowballs, the tiny powerhouse of frozen treats that's been gracing the intersection of Airport Boulevard and 51st Street for more than two decades. "Traditionally, your sno-cone, you're gonna take cubes of ice and put them

in a machine that grinds them - so what you get are these little crunchy spheres, basically. They don't really pack together very well, and when you pour syrup on 'em, most of it goes right to the bottom. Whereas we take a block of

ice and put it into a machine that shaves it, making these fluffy little snowflakes, and so when we pack them together in a cup they're kind of like a sponge that holds the syrup in, distributes it more evenly throughout the whole cup – and that snow is just super soft and velvety and melts in your mouth. That's the difference."

The whole story of how this beloved neighborhood icon came to be and how it's evolved over the years is related at length on the company's website, so we'll just gloss it for you here. Back in 1996, Suzy Casey Gallagher and Kit Thompson, a couple from Louisiana, decided to replicate their family's Metairie-based business in Austin. "I think they had a trailer on the Drag for one or two years," says Chapman, "before they purchased and renovated the space where we currently are. I found out about this place on 51st when I was less than 10 years old: My aunt brought me here a few times, and then I started coming here with my mom and dad."

Chapman's mom and dad - Pattve Henderson and Cliff Chapman - were enchanted by the frozen-treat business, its chilly pleasures, and the welcoming community around it. "So my dad got a job washing bottles here," says Chapman, "and then he learned how to make snowballs." And eventually decided, with his employers' blessings, to set up a similar place of his own across town. "In 2000, we drove to Alabama to get a trailer, stopped in New

Orleans and got supplies on the way back, and, well - it snowballed from there."

It snowballed, says the thirtysomething man with the earnest smile and an entrepreneurial twinkle in his eye. He remembers how his par-

ents worked their own trailer, called Raspas, over on Anderson Lane for seven years, recalls what it was like growing up as part of that family business.

"My very first job was working for my parents, harvesting the ice. And we started out in a way that - I will fully own this - was not exactly code-compliant: We were making ice out of our dining room. We had a commercial block icemaker in there, and the condenser for it was under the house - we lived in a pierand-beam house over in Hyde Park - and we had a deep freezer on the other side of the doorway. So we'd be in there, makin' all the ice. And, obviously, you aren't supposed to do that - but that was many years ago. We haven't done it like that for a long time since - I wanna be real clear about that!"

The Raspas company was sold to a former employee in 2008 so Chapman's parents could take over Casey's from its

original owners. Then, much time passing and retirement ensuing for the snowball-loving couple of Pattye and Cliff. the company passed over to their son Mars and his longtime co-worker Kyle Littlepage. And now, at the tail end of a pandemic and the ramping up of global warming, it's just Mars Chapman as head honcho, overseeing a happy crew of icemongers in a place that's open only ... seasonally?

"People always think we open on Memorial Day," says Chapman. "But we don't - we open on March 1, or around there. And we stay open until about Halloween. We're closed for about four months of each year and open for eight months."

Is the crew happy for real, though? They seem happy enough as they greet you at the window and take your order for something sweet and cold to soothe your heat-embattled senses. But is Casey's actually a good place to work? Chapman, who's aligned the company with the industry-progressive collective of Good Work Austin, tries to make sure of it. "We guarantee that all of our servers earn at least \$15 an hour - they get

a base wage and we pool tips by pay period. And we're adding a highly subsidized primary care benefit for our staff, so, for like 15 bucks a month, they'll be able to call up a physician. And, yes, it's just direct care, it's not health insurance - but it's something. And I have a stance that, if a snowball shop can do that, why can't somebody else? If we can find a way, with this seasonal business model, to treat people well and provide subsidized health care, this is what all businesses should be doing. Casey's is nowhere near perfect, but we're always gonna try to do the right thing if we can."

And what's one of the rightest things they can do for their customers? To offer a respite from the harsh Texas sun, we suggest - by continuing to serve up the snowballs we like best. Which are what, precisely?

Chapman appreciates this question, his taste buds obviously familiar with the wares he so vigorously promotes. "The most popular flavors of the regular ones are strawberry, pineapple, tiger blood - which is a strawberry and coconut mix - and mango.

And our most popular creamy flavor is strawberry cheesecake, which tastes just like you'd think, and all the others are fighting for second place."

Yes, let's not forget about those creamy flavors: They're the not-so-secret weapon that sets Casey's array of goodness apart from so many others.

"Our creamy flavors are unique to us," confirms Chapman. "They're typical in New Orleans, the creamy and dessert-y flavors, and we offer multiple varieties: Orchid Cream Vanilla, which tastes like the marshmallows in Lucky Charms; and the Dreamsicle, which is orange cream and vanilla bean; and the Boston cream pie - that's custard syrup with cream topping and chocolate drizzled on top, and it's my personal favorite. Custard is the most underappreciated flavor on our menu. If you put custard and almost any other flavor, and a little bit of vanilla and cream, it'll make a pie or a cobbler or a muffin sort [of] thing. So if you take blueberry and sour apple and add it to that, you'll get this delicious apple pie flavor."

Your reporter, having skipped lunch, is nigh on drooling at this point. This effect is mitigated, though, as he, an ardent enemy of Mentha spicata, suddenly notices that the flavor is listed among the noncreamy options on Casey's menu.

What is this treachery? Why must there be some foul serpent among the wonders of snowball paradise?

"The spearmint's not going away," insists Chapman, "because that's a classic New Orleans flavor. So as long as we're called Casey's New Orleans Snowballs, we will have it on the menu. Because if someone

comes here from Louisiana, they'll be like, 'You say you're New Orleans snowballs, but you don't have spearmint? You aren't real.' So we're keeping it."

They'll be keeping the longtime shop at 51st and Airport, too, although plans are in the works for a remodeling. And when -if. Chapman points out, because it depends on available funds - when the remodeling's being done, it won't interrupt service as would be the case for other businesses: because seasonal, remember? We remembered, and to wrap this story properly, we had to ask. Not about any potential remodeling action, but just in general: What happens during the four months that Casey's is closed?

"Uh, I live?" Chapman replies.

And this place just ... hangs out?

"This place hangs out," Chapman nods. "And it sucks money – that's what it does.

"When my mom and dad bought the business, they also bought the property. And that's a godsend because of just how expensive it is between property taxes and rent. Especially now, with my parents retired and not involved in the business at all, the fact that we're paying them rent, that's a way for the money to stay in the family. Otherwise, if we'd been paying that out, it'd drastically change the economic viability of the business for us."

Chapman's gaze shifts around the interior of his store, taking in the front window and the line of customers beyond, the stainless steel tables and neatly arranged bottles of syrup in the prep area, the ice-shaving equipment and his bustling crew of young workers. He smiles, nodding, more satisfied than wistful.

"Nobody gets rich making snowballs," he says, "but it is a nice quality of life."

Sharing a parking lot with Austin Pets Alive!'s thrift store on Burnet, SnowBowla is a cheery little trailer serving up Hawaiian shave ice with a whole cornucopia of flavors. Owner Aleisha Zolman makes all her syrups using vegan sugar and offers them with traditional colorings and a few dye-free flavors. There are also essential oil flavors like lavender and lemon basil. SNO.CO FLATTOP SHAVED ICE

This tiny truck on Manor Road serves up its treats in color-changing cups you can keep as a souvenir to remind you of the fresh fruit-infused shaved ice that definitely saved your life on yet another triple-digit day. Try the Koolickle, a punchy yet balanced marriage of cherry Kool-Aid and pickle juice, topped with pickle slices marinated in that tasty childhood beverage. SNO-BEACH

For Zilker Park- and Barton Springs-goers, here's a little tuckedaway shaved ice truck chockablock with so many flavor options, FOMO is inevitable. Maybe you'll choose the green apple sour, but dagnabbit, there's also a Dr Pepper and cherry option! Guess you'll iust have to keep coming back until you've satisfied your curiosity. JIM-JIM'S WATER ICE

No trip to Deep Eddy Pool is complete without a cup of Jim-Jim's from the concession stand. While most ice-based treats in town are of the shaved ice variety. Jim-Jim's reps Philly's Italian ice tradition from its walk-up headquarters on East Sixth Street. Their smooth, slushy concoctions cover most of the basic tastes, excepting bitter and salty. Choose sour watermelon for some Jolly Rancher nostalgia, bubblegum and dragon's blood for sweet on sweet, or seek out root beer for a hint of umami (but still mostly sweet). FRUTA FREEZE

This little trailer popped up in Patterson Park in summer 2021, selling Mexican-style raspas to eager neighbors. There are three bases on offer: traditional plain ice, fresi-raspa with frozen strawberries blended in, and raspa tropical with frozen mango, pineapple, and peach blended in. Add a syrup like mango or tamarindo, then customize to make it spicy or sweet with chamoy and Tajín or condensed milk and shaved coconut. The only limit is your imagination. Food News Buffet

Here's some of what's happening in Austin's culinary scene, as wrangled from numerous PR releases, words on the digital street, and even the occasional (verified) IRL eavesdroppings.

Sala & Betty (5201 Airport), the neighborhood powerhouse of elevated comfort food, will be shutting down regular service at the end of July and remain open only for private parties in August – and then close forever. "With over 40 years in business," the company's recent Facebook post informs us, "chef Teresa Wilson is ready to slow down and spend time with family."

Z'Tejas (1110 W. Sixth) isn't closed yet, no. But the longtime bastion of Southwestern cuisine will be gone from that space for good - 'round December of this year. Co-owner Randy Cohen and his crew will have to find a new location Downtown or thereabouts to complement the other Z'Teias location in Avery Ranch and the eventual third place they're planning to open in Kyle. We don't yet know what the West Sixth property's owner - Larry McGuire of McGuire Moorman **Lambert Hospitality** – will build there after the old place is torn down, but we do know that change is the only constant in this life, n'est-ce pas? Meanwhile, there's still time to revisit Z'Tejas and get yourself, say, one of those smoked chicken chile rellenos with the green and red sauces, and the crispy ialapeños, and the cotiia cheese, zteias.com.

Chef Bob Somsith of SXSE Food Co. (10615 Metric) reveals his newest Chef's Table dinners - Season 2. Act IV - showcasing his modern spin on Laotian food, expertly paired with beers from 4th Tap Brewing, coming up in August and September. Go for the food, stay for the beer: The combo of SXSE and 4th Tap is one of this city's not-sosecret connoisseur secrets. sxsefoodco.com.

Also on the way in August is the Four Seasons' new afternoon tea, called A-Tea-X, with miniature smoked brisket sandwiches, chicken salpicon bites, and mango shrimp cocktail, and chocolate tacos and matcha profiteroles for dessert. And, oh, the tea and those cocktails! (For instance: My Darling Earl, with milk-washed bourbon, Earl Grey simple syrup, and Angostura bitters.) That'll be Mon.-Fri., 2-4pm, and well worth going Downtown (98 San Jacinto) for.

Prim and Proper at Neighborhood Goods (1007 S. Congress) has launched new summer specials right now, every day of the week. We're talking about half-off coffee and pastries from 10am until noon, Mon .-Tue.: half-off lunch deals on Thursdays from 11:30am until 3pm; free sparkling rosé and prosecco after 5pm on Fridays; and - oh, check 'em out at primandproper.co.

Favor, the Texas-based on-demand delivery service, has chosen Chris Flores of San Antonio as its first-ever Chief Taco Officer. Favor is paying the lucky man \$10,000 to eat and review tacos across Texas. Naturally, Flores also gets free delivery from Favor for a year - along with, like, a veritable plethora of swag. Pro tip, buddy: Don't miss out on De Nada Cantina (4715 E. Cesar Chavez), Nixta Tagueria (2512 E. 12th), and Suerte (1800 E. Sixth) while you're prowling the Austin scene.

Now eat as well as you can, tip like it's going out of style, and be kind to the future.

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

Raw Punks Mujeres Podridas on Comfort and Love

Brutal bandmates get nostalgic ahead of free Saturday show at Fairweather Cider

Across time and space, the members of Mujeres Podridas made their way from upbringings in Texas' Rio Grande Valley to current punk production in Austin. On different musically minded arrival timelines, all managed to find each other here: vocalist Dru Molina. bassist Eddie Leal, guitarist John Morales, drummer Phil Gonzalez, and recent second guitarist Dexter Garza. Meaning to discuss 2021 record Muerte en Paraíso throughout the pandemic, I finally caught Molina and Morales mid-workday at longtime local adult toy manufacturers Vixen Creations.

"We all just really wanted to start a band with all Valley people, and it evolved from there," explains Molina, whose ethereally caustic Spanish lyricism leads the pack.

"I was the last one to show up," adds Morales, also of **Breakout** and **Damak**, who actually hand-pours the silicone. "When one of my old bands did a little Texas run, we were told to hit up Dru for a show. I later moved here with the opportunity to clean windows, but I heard about this dildo factory where everyone worked, and the rest is history."

The quintet plays a free show this Saturday, July 16, at the very cool, colorful North Austin taproom of Fairweather Cider Co. with Flower

City. Band member Gonzalez, senior designer at Feels So Good screenprinting, also spins international rarities as DJ Mr. DNA. Beyond the band's love of reinterpreting Eighties Spanish punk, discussion of shared Texas influence leads to a lesson on RGV phonetics.

"I don't think it really informs the writing; there's just a comfortability," says Morales. "There's little isms, inside jokes, and I can get those off. Other bands I'm in, with non-Texas people, I'm doing the ahhhh and they're like, 'What the hell?'

"It's made it a lot easier to just be," furthers Molina. "It's almost like a security blanket, after you say a joke you're like ahhhh [with tongue clicks]. It's like being home."

"Without driving five-and-a-half hours," adds the guitarist.

With just one Mexico tour preceding a recent April East Coast run. Muieres Podridas garners an established following - with Muerte en Paraíso requiring three vinvl pressings on Virginia hardcore label Beach Impediment Records. Dru credits over 20 years in the DIY scene, as she and bassist Leal share résumés in heavy projects Criaturas, Kurrakä, and Mirror. Leal also leads fellow Beach Impediment affiliate Vaaska.

"Anything me and [Leal] have ever done has always been more hardcore, but this band has been received where it's not just punks coming to our shows," says Molina. "That's been very different for us, these bigger, more professional shows. And this record, I've never written anything so personal. It's always been about the system, you know?"

Two years of work on Muerte en Paraíso encompassed the romantic breakup of longtime collaborators Molina and Leal. In the same songwriting span, the Texan singer met hardcore musician Tord Bang-Steinsvik, vacationing locally from Oslo. After long-distance back-and-forth visits, like when Kurrakä played K-Town Hardcore Fest in Denmark, they got married and settled in Austin a year ago.

"You can hear it through the songs; there's a lot of anger and sadness and happiness," says Molina. "I'm still a little teary-eyed even talking about it. It was really hard, and also really special that I had a platform where I

could say these things. It was like therapy for me, so I was really appreciative that my bandmates let me do that."

Sonically, Molina and Morales respectively describe the energy of Muerte en Paraíso (meaning "death in paradise") as "beachy, palmy" and "South Padre, coastline, Gulf of Mexico type of thing." The guitarist referenced effects used by pioneering Eighties Mexican cumbia ensemble Tropical Panamá. For new songs in the works, they mention nostalgic mainstream sounds of their youth from Hombres G to Juanes - to somehow be fractured through their unrefined punk prism.

The charismatic Morales sets a scene: "Not really to incorporate it [musically]. but there is that feeling: You're listening to 'Chattahoochee' in the nurse's office to get out of elementary school. They're playing 'Livin' on Love' while you're waiting for your dad to pick you up so you can watch Maury, because you faked vomiting."

CROSSTALK

RESOUND PRESENTS and Desert Door Texas Sotol launch Unreleased, a "semi-battle-of-thebands" featuring 16 Texas artists selected by the Austin-based independent concert promoters. Voting is open through July 29 at resoundpresents. com/unreleased, for the top eight bands fans would like to see compete Sept. 18 at Parish. It's a fun bunch of Central Texas acts, from SoundCloudonly local students **Diego Ate the Drummer** to Austin hip-hop standard **Mike Melinoe** to Dallas Audiotree Live pick **Ariel & the Culture**. Showcase tickets go on sale in early August - with proceeds benefiting Desert Door's conservation nonprofit Wild Spirit Wild Places and local Black Fret. Live audiences will vote on the winner of a fully produced music video and a runner-up, both of whom will open for a national touring act at Mohawk.

SIXTH STREET could see various new music venues as part of grand redevelopment plans by Dallas' Stream Realty Partners, which acquired 32 storefronts on both sides of East Sixth (revisit "Can Dirty Sixth Be Cleaned Up?" June 17). New plans for the 500 block include a below-ground venue, alongside a boutique hotel managed by Austin's Bunkhouse Group. As for the 600 block, Austin-based VP Caitlyn Ryan presented plans to the Music Commission in late June, where she said: "My whole goal, eventually, is to bring **Emo's** - in any way, shape or form - back to this [block] because this is where they started." She said the Emo's-ish concept could house office space by day, like the Radio City Music Hall building. Other music-integrating candidates include the former locations of now-shuttered businesses Easy Tiger, Buffalo Billiards, and Dirty Dog Bar.

STRANGER THINGS delivers another soundtrack of supernatural soundscapes by Austin composers Kvle Dixon & Michael Stein - beyond the new season's hit placement of "Running up That Hill." The Texas musicians, half of local synth quartet SURVIVE, have scored the fictional town of Hawkins. Indiana, since the show's 2016 launch. Like the fourth season, the whopping album of 80 originals is divided into two volumes, packing fan-insider titles like "My BOOBS Hurt." and captionreferencing "[delicate, intense music playing...]." Find Stranger Things 4 (Original Score From the Netflix Series) on Lakeshore Records.

ACL FEST added a bundle of artists to the Zilker Park lineup. like Marcus Mumford of Mumford & Sons. Gabriels. Spill Tab, and Danielle Ponder. Weekend 1. Oct. 7-9. also adds Adrian Quesada of Black Pumas' homegrown new album/solo outlet Boleros Psicodélicos, the Ventures, and Walt Disco. Weekend 2, Oct. 14-16, now promises **Death Cab for Cutie, Culture** Club. Tai Verdes, and the Brummies. Tickets to the second weekend are still available at \$347.84 including fees.

WE DON'T RIDE LLAMAS.

Adrian Quesada Is a Travellin' Man

Austin's unassuming superstar and the long path to his first official solo release: Boleros Psicodélicos

Somehow, Adrian Quesada remains unimpressed with himself. Yes, things are very good for the multihyphenate, to say the least. Of course, Quesada has built out a homegrown world-championship-level team as the Black Pumas' player-coach, to use a basketball analogy he would appreciate. He has released a fantastic new record of modern psychedelic boleros. Argentinian singer and longtime Thievery Corporation collaborator Natalia Clavier described the 45-yearold Laredo native as "the most talkedabout man in the Latin music everything right now," aside from the current reggaeton galácticos.

As a person in demand, he's always on the move, like then-Mos Def on "Travellin' Man": "I'm a travellin' man/ Movin' through places, space and time/ Got a lot of things I got to do."

None of this seems to register with Quesada.

Please take the following anecdote: I texted Quesada for the phone number of Pumas' pacesetter Stephen Bidwell, which he promptly sent over. Almost as quickly, he texted that the talented drummer was not on his new album, his first official solo release, Boleros Psicodélicos, and didn't want to "ruffle any feathers" because only one other Pumas member made the record.

The preceding, seemingly inconsequential story proves informative. Here the Austinite is, a full-blown, article-prefixed star - as in, the Adrian Quesada, who could easily care little about anyone's feelings, even those of the people (very technically) working for him. Few would publicly condemn Quesada (or Pumas lead singer Eric Burton) if they "went Hollywood," to whatever extent; these things tend to come part and parcel with ascendance and financial gain. The "spoils" can occasionally include frosty temperaments and gratuitous self-pats. However, it is the opposite for Quesada: he's incredibly concerned about the feelings and lives of those within his various concentric circles.

Quesada's work ethic and willingness to be patient are even more impressive than his grace and humility - even if it was often involuntary and unplanned. Superstars, real ones, typically aren't forged overnight. It's rounds of hurry-up-and-wait, being the right people, with the right people, at the right time - an idea to which Black Pumas serve as an example. Success can suddenly arrive in a hurry for those willing to stay in

But what do you do once you've got everything you dreamed of? What does superstardom look like for Adrian Quesada in real time - especially when he's decided never to act as one?

"What is 25-year-old Adrian doing?" I ask Quesada from the couch at his Electric Deluxe studio on Austin's Eastside. It's a curious location - situated in a non-glorious lot of storage units and workshops next to businesses where people in coveralls turn wrenches. It was here that he recorded the 12 mesmeric, guest vocalist-heavy tracks making up Boleros Psicodélicos.

"Twenty-five was not good. Twenty-five, I would've blown this shit big time," says Quesada. "At 30 years old, I was pretty focused because I had a daughter at 28, and that was when we started playing with

(Yes, Adrian Quesada once worked with Prince. Yes, that one. Eventual Grammy winners Grupo Fantasma served as a house band at his Las Vegas nightclub in 2007 and also backed him at Super Bowl and Golden Globe parties.)

"I was playing with him, coming home, and delivering food at night to pay the bills," he continued. "I had a little studio, and I would crank out in the studio during the day, play gigs with Grupo, and then deliver food at night. Celeste was at home taking care of our kid. That was real-life shit - it made me prioritize my time right away. Every year, I've become more grounded and able to process everything better."

The guitarist also admits to being more "hotheaded and bigheaded" in those days. The constant production toil and Grupo's work kept his name ringing in various circles. There was a project with jazz/soul analog Adrian Younge and his solid work

with Martín Perna (from Brooklyn-based Afrobeat group Antibalas) as Ocote Soul Sounds. Another side project under the Echocentrics moniker would be helpful for a later undertaking.

Then, he admits something surprising.

"I've been humbled a lot through the shit," he says, matter-of-factly. "I just saw [esteemed rapper and academic] Bavu Blakes play at the Far Out a month ago, and we hung out there. I told him, 'Man, right before Pumas, I was about to take another

For reference, "right before Pumas" means four years ago, or roughly a year or two before the Black Pumas' 2019 debut. And now that he has the massive platform, he says he's hungrier than ever. Outside Pumas' efforts, he has other side missions to complete, including working with Jay-Z, which would be "the top of the mountain," as he sees it.

"It's obsessive," he confesses. "I was thinking the other day, I'm like, 'Damn, I'm at a point where I can take some real time off.' Do whatever I want to do. That part of the thing with the pandemic was trying to have hobbies. I do a lot of bike riding. But it's detrimental to a point. I don't know what it would take to make me stop and breathe. I see these opportunities, and I'm like, 'Damn, I can't miss this window now that people are paying attention to Pumas, and I'm putting another album on the side. I can't miss that window because I don't know when I'll have that window again."

Even with the new opportunities, it

doesn't appear that Quesada's compass has changed much. He's still the same workaholic musician, the same exceedingly pleasant and thoughtful human. There are no "I'm top shit" airs wafting off him at any point, but then you speak to his wife, and one can see why.

Adrian Quesada is sturdy, partly because his talented wife, Celeste, is also made of polished granite. The Quesadas are exceptionally family-oriented and are pillars of strength, especially of the spiritual and moral kind.

"There are similarities that Adrian and I share, within our intimate world, as people, and as partners," explains the philanthropist and former producer of the Austin Music Awards. "I, very much, subscribe to many of his philosophies in my way, and I think that's what makes us complementary. It feels like I'm the air traffic control - the hub of his world, our two daughters' world, and our extended family's world. It's part of our fabric."

She adds to their mission as a family unit, a shared heritage, and Adrian's public ascension with Black Pumas, which she speaks of as an ongoing process: "I think this is what we signed up for. We are creating our life story; what we are most attracted to are people who keep it real.

"The more and more we are fortunate to be blessed with, the more we feel committed to giving back to our community," she continues, with a dose of implied meaning. "We instill into our children that our ancestors – our parents from both sides – did not work this hard to take it all for granted. And we do our part to the best of our ability. And we learn every single day how to look within and try to be better for our community. I mean, both of us are first-generation [Americans]. The state of the world has not gone past us."

Lying in an overlapping circle are Quesada's Pumas bandmates, nearly all of whom admit their overwhelming success is as much a result of impeccable timing as their collective talent.

"The biggest reason is my personal life wouldn't have allowed it because my kids were so much younger then," said singer Lauren Cervantes when asked whether all of this would've been possible years ago. "But even like mentally, I don't think I was mature enough. I don't think I would've

had the tools. I wouldn't have known back then to remove myself from that to maintain a balance."

Her "sister" and backup singing partner Angela Miller concurs: "Can you imagine being freshly married and then having to tell your spouse that you're about to travel and be gone two, three weeks out of a month?"

She half-rambles and laughs at the idea. "Oh God, it was not going to work," she admits. "Yeah, I'd probably been divorced. I'd have to *choose*; you know what I mean? I'd be broke; I'd probably be living under 35."

Lead singer Eric Burton, however, sees the Pumas' success as right on time. He prefers not to consider the whole of it, not to over-

whelm the present and what lies ahead.

"I feel like it could be distracting for me to dwell too much on what people are saying about it, how big the venues are, or even people's reaction to the music and performances after the fact," says Burton. "I don't think about it. I rely on the fact that in our most basic form as human beings, we're intellectual. And for me, that means that if I can delegate most of my energy and focus on creating the next new thing, then everything else will come."

The reality likely lies between Burton's assurance in "the right time being today"

and the slightly older members' knowledge and honesty of their younger selves. One unanimous item is Quesada's leadership and *leadership style*, in being the group's north star – or at least the one pointing at it.

"Adrian's whole thing throughout all of this is like this no-pressure attitude," says Cervantes, whose thoughts echo with everyone interviewed. "[Maybe] that's how he's able to have so many projects and work on so many things. He's not overly critical of himself or us. He lets the music happen organically. You never feel like, "This is your boss, and you must produce whatever for him.' It doesn't feel like that. I don't think I would know how to be in the music machine if it wasn't for Adrian."

Cervantes is probably not *entirely* accurate about Quesada not being overly critical of himself.

"Honestly, I just feel like I need to get better all the time," he says. "I hear the

Pumas album, and I hear things that I could have done better."

While considering why this was the right time for a solo album, Quesada sees it as an opportunity to express himself - not in a way that disrespects Black Pumas but augments its success. Also, ATO, his label, implied the window for a non-Pumas project might not remain open long, "striking while the iron is hot," and the like. Gabriel Garzón-Montano, a New York-based vocalist and multi-instrumentalist who sings on the excellent "El Paraguas," offers another consideration: "You must always do new work that honors your relationship with the craft."

The preceding reflections are likely why his latest offering, *Boleros Psicodélicos*, is the first record with his name front and center. Think about it – many knew Adrian Quesada before the Black Pumas or had some awareness. But how many of his releases could someone remember where he wasn't working behind an alias? One could perceive this as an artist compartmentalizing, and perhaps this is true. But he also concedes to some measure of fear, which he's overcome.

"I'm not afraid to just put my name on it anymore," he says. "On the one hand, I used to be nervous about putting my name

out there like that. Now, on the other hand, there's a name recognition from Pumas, so I may as well embrace that people are paying attention."

And *Boleros* is a project to pay attention to, with its outstanding features and historical nods. Bolero music – not to be confused with French composer Maurice Ravel's orchestral masterpiece – originated in 19th-century eastern Cuba's trova tradition. Its hopeless romantic stylings eventually spilled into the rest of Latin America, including Mexico and Puerto Rico. It existed all around Quesada, who initially was not interested, preferring Wu-Tang Clan and DJ Premier productions over classic Javier Solís cuts.

"I was actually with my dad in Mexico one time, under the influence of a lot of drinks," he recalls. "I remember they were playing music at a restaurant, and I was like, 'Damn, this is beautiful."

The producer first experimented with the form on 2011's Echocentrics project, *Sunshadows* – recording a cover of the bolero standard "Esclavo y Amo," sung by Natalia Clavier. The 2022 version for *Boleros* is superior, warmer, and more in tune with the mid-late Sixties/early Seventies psychedelic sound. The Argentinian vocalist remembers him saying, "I can't believe you're not calling me crazy," when detailing his psychedelic angle.

She says she's "fucking stoked about [Quesada's success] because if anybody deserves recognition and popularity, it's this guy because he has been grinding in this industry for over two decades – and

always with this quality of being so humble, so down to earth, never bragging about his crazy skills." (See, there it is again.)

Dreams are usually made of moments hard to qualify within the moments they are occurring, but they can be documented on occasion.


"It's crazy," Quesada starts. "There was a guy on our crew as our backline tech. We were talking about [playing for tens of thousands of people] because we opened for the Stones. [Ed. note: Yes, *the* Rolling Stones.] We talked about watching MTV when you're a kid, and you think that's how it will be, but it's not really how it always is.

"When you're a kid, you don't realize that there's a healthy middle to upper-middle class of people working in music. Those people don't exist [when you're young]. We talked about how once you start doing it, you realize – I wouldn't say it's just a job, but it is somewhat. When we did the Stones gig, I remember telling him that's what I thought it would be like when I was a kid, all the time, every stadium."

When I relay how it appears on social media or television – to mean larger than life – he's appreciative of the distance he's traveled.

"With Grupo, we had some of the best shows I've ever played," says Quesada. "But when you have a few nights of a slow turnout at a small club, it affects you mentally. It also wears you down. It affects how you perform.

"If you were walking out to sold-out crowds, it's hard to fuck that up."

XI: Bleed Here Now (Dine Alone)

Quadraphonic sound ... that Seventies audio format that was basically the forerunner of surround sound, requiring special four-channel systems for full, accurate reproduction?! The differences in the types of encoding/decoding systems available, espe-

cially with vinyl records, spelled failure for it. But in quad's infancy, its grandiosity made it absolutely appealing to prog outfits – Pink Floyd even used a quad concert PA as early as 1967.

Leave it to Austin's most ambitious rock band, ... And You Will Know Us by the Trail of Dead, to tilt at this particular windmill for their 11th studio album, XI: Bleed Here Now.

No, this hardly says anything about the actual music contained in these grooves. Except that the format matches it; epic. over-the-top, enormous in scale. Bleed - produced by eternal core Conrad Keely and Jason Reece, who are now backed by the instrumentally dexterous foursome of Ben Redman, Alec Padron, John Dowey, and AJ Vincent - is absolutely 21st-century progressive rock, with strings, synths, keyboards galore, and a wash of massed acoustic guitars underpinning virtually every song, even when electric guitars blast over the top. The dynamic range runs from whisper-quiet (like the gently fingerpicked "Growing Divide" where Spoon's Britt Daniel provides a vocal assist on lines like "Don't let the sight of the growing divide make you give up on humanity") to sheer bombast, with lyrics about death and abandoned cities, clearly written during the darkest days of COVID-19, reminding you when this 22-song journey was made. "Look down empty avenues/ To bleed a way out," rues the upbeat, piano-driven "Field Song," before emerging defiant and hopeful: "Just because we're stagnant doesn't mean we're beaten down." "Kill Everyone," a rampaging punk rocker, snarls about "a black death, a black plague," then lamenting, "It's the same war, son/ Why did we have to kill everyone?" Even listening in fold-in stereo, the quad mixes are bold and rich, befitting the scale of Trail of Dead's accomplishment.

ANGÉLICA RAHE

Autorretrato

As if surrendering to the spirits of her forebears, Angélica Rahe's falsetto floats as she teases volando. Translating to "flying," she does just that as each word rides the air then soars to a great proverbial expanse on "Ancestros."

An extension of her debut Reina (2020), Autorretrato clutches her cultural heritage like a coveted heirloom as the record is sung almost entirely in Spanish, her first language - having been raised

in Spain, Japan, and the United States. Family memories crystallize into poetic supplications as musings like "I come with my mother's curves, my dad's guitar" ("Ancestros") and "My old lady's prayers" ("Detrás de la Cortina") make small details sharpen into crisp focus.

While Reina flirts with love as a relentless and all-consuming desire, Autorretrato reclaims that love for herself. Whether crafting herself in infinite parts ("Soy Una Obra de Arte") or growing like sinuous roots from a seed ("Semillas"), the Los Angeles-to-Austin artist captures self-love as an embodying experience made corporeal. She drags out her prose in delayed gratification of a physical rush as words in "Como Tú Me Vez" suspend like gravity, crescendo in high ecstasy, or stretch syllables to eternity.

Once Kali Uchis' musical director and guitarist, Rahe's knowledge shines. Keys echo crystalclear resonance ("No Me Vale"), synths ripple like the deep ocean, restrained and reverberating strums ("Sueño Fugaz") liquify soul, jazz, and hip-hop into ethereal and cool arrangements. Written, recorded, and produced alone in her bedroom studio, Autorretrato thrives in simplicity. Like a lingering touch, warm embrace, or longing look, her sophomore record swells in a vulnerable vastness of tactile and sensual intimacies, wave after wave.

KENDRICK LAMAR

Moody Center, Thursday 21

In May, hip-hop's long-absent guiding conscience returned. Though our decaying world expected salvation, the messianic MC rose bearing an evasive, eremitic double LP that offered no overarching political comment, no rap-along anthems, no solutions to our societal woes, but, instead ... lyrics about therapeutic water fasts and the hollow comfort of luxury cars? Had Kendrick's poetic eve finally shifted downward from America's streets to his millionaire's naval? Oh God ... is he rapping about cancel culture?

How shortsighted we were. Kendrick Lamar understands the stakes perfectly. He won

acclaim with a series of albums that vividly rendered the reality of his surroundings, but the empathetic acuity of his reportage quickly became mistaken for the faultlessness of his personhood. Mr. Morale & the Big Steppers is the turning away, the Yeezus, the In Utero - the standoffish swerve that emphasizes Kendrick's fragile, difficult humanity to save his unparalleled artistry. Sure, it's upsetting to hear the voice of a generation echoing around in his own head - fixated on his trauma rather than ours - but it's also unmistakably honest, and isn't that what we all come to Kendrick for?

Well, maybe not. Recent festival set lists suggest that the Big Steppers tour will go heavy on old favorites. Taken at face value, you could read this as a musician cowing to public opinion, quickly moving past his "flop" era. But I disagree; this is confidence. He knows Mr. Morale has done its job and recontextualized his music forever. Kendrick Lamar is not, has not been, will not be "your savior." - Julian Towers

Since her multiple-Grammy-garnering 2018 LP, By the Way, I Forgive You, Brandi Carlile has written an autobiography, created the female supergroup the Highwomen, and celebrated Joni Mitchell and Tanya Tucker to a new generation, producing the latter's Grammy-winning comeback. Still, last year's seventh LP, In These Silent Days, delivers the highlight of the past five years, weaving touches of Mitchell and Tucker into Carlile's powerfully torching ballads and deeply personal narratives facing off with doubt and defiance. Electro-pop quintet Lucius opens, grooving new Second Nature, before taping their Austin City Limits debut on Sunday. - Doug Freeman






