

In response to the letter writer who perceived the \$24-per-day cost of parking his personal vehicle at the airport as exorbitant ["Feedback: Parking Problems," July 11], one could just as easily argue that this service is underpriced in that it fails to reflect or offset the "high cost of free parking" revealed by UCLA urban planning professor Donald Shoup in his 2005 book of the same name.

My partner and I recently traveled to and from AUS as well. We rode our folding bicycles, packed them up when we got there, and hopped on the light rail in Minneapolis. Until such time as Austin catches up to most cities of its echelon in offering airport transit by train, those averse to the automobile parking price tag are welcome to take a bike, bus, shuttle, taxicab, ride share, or ride from a friend to get to and fro. It then costs \$0.00 per day to park, though admittedly perhaps somewhat more in hassle, which may serve to shift the focus on the topic of airport parking from why it's so dang expensive to what other, more innovative transportation options exist.

Amid soaring temperatures and gas prices, we need to ask, will Project Connect's \$7+ billion tax plan give us a public transit system that car drivers will use?

Historically, urban planners (such as Jane Jacobs) argued that a diverse downtown is more important than monolithic dense housing. For several years, Austin rail advocates supported densifying central Austin, saving that would protect the environment and reduce pollution. For a while, Austin encouraged porches to be built on new houses to promote walkable, friendly neighborhoods but that stopped when developers realized they could maximize profits just BY BARBARA building condominiums. Then EPSTEIN there was a period of encouraging mixed-use buildings - stores on the ground floor, housing above - until businesses failed, between rising rents and insufficient parking and public transit,

Former Council Member Greg Casar was quoted as saying that a \$23 million fund from the transit tax meant "tenants [can] actually buy out their landlords and [form] a cooperative so that people who might get pushed out by rising rents become the owners of their own apartment communities." (Austin's displacement prevention officer wrote me that Austin has no such program.) Although a rail stop may sell a condo, there's no guarantee that newcomers will use public transit if it still takes less time to drive. Arguably, since people are fleeing Austin for less expensive suburbs, Cap Metro's plan is actually promoting more cars driving around Austin.

to sustain store traffic.

Cap Metro primarily "plans" straight line routes, bus and rail, that don't take riders anywhere in particular (e.g., the No. 335 crosstown bus bypassed Hancock Center) and ignores safety issues riders submit (e.g., Hancock Center). (The city says the safety issue at Hancock Center won't become a "priority" until someone is killed.) Cap Metro doesn't budget for and create transit for what is called "the last mile," transit that takes riders to their actual destinations using circulators, like the UT shuttles and the old (popular) Dillos.

The proposed plan also has a significant flaw. Fixed rail lines can't be endlessly modified to respond to changing urban needs. An advanced rapid bus system can, and was developed in Curitiba, Brazil, where some routes now run as frequently as every 90 seconds. A Cap Metro Board chairman traveled to Curitiba a couple of decades ago to observe the bus system, but apparently nothing came of his trip.

Austinites may be unaware that our area is the fastest-growing region in the country for seniors. In 2021, there were reported-

> ly 90,262 people over 65 here. Local senior services tell me they don't even have sufficient transit to take seniors to dialysis appointments. The only senior bus service Cap Metro provides right now (though it's not identified as a senior service

online) is neighborhood pickup vans in 10 outlying areas and Tarrytown that can't be used for anything outside an immediate neighborhood, such as a doctor's appointment across town.

In fact, Project Connect is proposing a transit system that can't meet current transit needs, much less those of the future. Project Connect planners aren't asking people where they need to go, they're asking whether people like the look of a stop. That's why we're expanding I-35 to 20 lanes in some places and why the Capitol will soon have 3,800 parking spaces. Those numbers starkly confirm that our community hasn't agreed to to give up its cars to use a bus or a train - many voters expect someone else to use them.

Cap Metro's system doesn't target essential destinations for anyone and Project Connect is not being held accountable by the public or city leaders.

Perhaps we should step back to ask whether these straight-line routes can give us efficient public transit, or merely permanent rail stops at new condominiums? Could our \$7+ billion tax be better used for citywide transit planning, capable of endless modification as conditions change? Perhaps most importantly for Austin's future, are we addressing pollution and climate change with this plan if a majority of residents still choose to drive their cars, not take slower buses and trains?

Barbara Epstein is an elder law attorney and serves on the board of Austin's aging-in-place group, Capital City Village. She has lived in Austin and depended on its bus system since 1974. As a legally blind senior herself, she advocates for better public transit because she knows firsthand that transit is a necessity for seniors and those who cannot, or should not, drive.

YOU SPIN ME ROUND (LIKE A TALKING POINT) Gov. Greg Abbott and challenger Beto O'Rourke will finally face off in debate, after agreeing Tuesday to set a date for Sept. 30 at the University of Texas-Rio Grande Valley in Edinburg, O'Rourke, on top of that, challenged Abbott to three additional town hall-style meetings.

TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE AIRPORT The entire Austin-Bergstrom International Airport was evacuated around 7:30am Wednesday (causing mass delays) after a fire alarm went off in the main Barbara Jordan terminal. A water main break outside the building set the alarm off; the cause of the break is still under investigation, airport officials said.

GIRLS JUST WANT TO HAVE A NORMAL HUMAN TEMPERATURE On Tuesday, Cap Metro announced, effective immediately, they will offer free rides to cooling centers when a heat advisory (typically 103 degrees or higher) is activated within its service area. That policy came under fire from activists including Texas Harm **Reduction Alliance**, who asked why temperatures needed to be so high to trigger free rides.

DO STOP BELIEVIN' The FBI raid at Donald Trump's resort sent shockwaves through the country Tuesday. The investigation deals with the required preservation of all presidential documents, and the even-more regulated transportation and storage of classified documents. Trump has reportedly torn documents up, flushed them down the toilet, and kept others as mementos, while a Watergate-era law maintains that all of them must remain in the custody of the National Archives.

MOST OFTEN GONNA GIVE YOU UP After bussing 6.000 migrants from the southern border to Washington D.C., Abbott sent two buses to New York City. the latter arriving Sunday, August 7, the Texas Tribune reported. Only 14 migrants were on the bus (others had apparently disembarked along the way) but they were greeted by NYC mayor Eric Adams, who called the bussing "horrific." He said people were forced aboard, even if they wanted to go to other parts of the country.

POUR SOME MICROCHIPS ON ME Prez Joe Biden signed the \$280 billion CHIPS and Science Act into law on Tuesday, a move that Biden says will supercharge efforts to make semiconductors (an essential component of electronic devices) in America. This is good news for Samsung, which already had a \$17 billion semiconductor factory in Taylor in the works, and Micron Technology. which is considering a new plant thereabouts.

(NIGHTMARES) ARE MADE OF THIS A dog died in a hot car Sunday after Round Rock police arrested the driver for a DWI. Police say the driver had the car on before the sobriety test but the engine later shut off on its own while police waited for an animal control officer.



Everything's a Priority Now

Council lines up its asks as a boom-time budget season nears its liturgical climax

It took a little longer than usual for the haggling phase of the fiscal year 2023 budget season to begin in earnest, but begun it has. City Council will convene on Wednesday, Aug. 17 for the budget adoption ritual, with additional meetings the next two days if needed, **AUSTIN** which I'm guessing, as I write this, they won't be. Much of **AT LARGE** this routine is scripted and BY MIKE CLARKkinda liturgical, as befits a milestone of the calendar of Austin's civic religion, but the Council message board is full of ideas that will have to be hashed out in real time, as Mayor Steve Adler presides over his last one of these ceremonies.

It took a minute for Council offices to reorient themselves when City Manager Spencer Cronk, who for several years had been warning Council that lean budget times were in the offing thanks to

> state-mandated caps on property tax revenue, instead rolled out a proposed budget July 15 filled with surplus as Austin rebounds from the COVID-19 recession with a vengeance. Pay raises (the largest in more than 15 years) for everyone! An \$18-per-hour minimum city wage!

(Lest you think that isn't a big deal, nearly 5,000 of the city's 12,000 employees make less than that now.) A \$1,500 acrossthe-board retention bonus! Even the looming fiscal hit of the yet-to-be-determined new public safety contracts did not give Cronk and his budget team pause before they decided to start spending Austin's latest boom dividends.

Now, Cronk's perspective as the city's CEO surely informs his desire to invest in the city's workforce, which ultimately makes his job easier, and I have no qualms about putting some money behind the general good vibes Austin has when it comes to government work. But enterprisewide compensation increases are, by definition, an imperfect response to actual organizational priorities - both Council's and



Cronk's, the latter fleshed out in his Strategic Direction 2023 five-year plan, of which we are now entering Year 5.

WHAT DOES COUNCIL WANT?

A quick overview of some of the budget priorities individual CMs have shared on the message board:

- Ann Kitchen wants to add a budget rider (note: Until Adler became mayor, budget riders were not a thing at City Hall) directing Cronk to continue the city's HEAL Initiative to close homeless encampments and move at least 200 people into bridge shelters, using remaining American Rescue Plan Act funds. She also wants to add five planners to begin work on district-level small area planning, which Council initiated via a resolution in June. Kitchen has support from Adler, Kathie Tovo, Vanessa Fuentes, and Chito Vela for the HEAL rider, and from Fuentes, Leslie Pool, and Mackenzie Kelly for the planning staffers.
- Fuentes' own priorities which she shared on the message board back on July 27 include funding for a trauma recovery center, more investment in stopping monkeypox (see p.17), defending reproductive health services, and ensuring the fire/EMS station in Goodnight Ranch, one of several huge master planned developments in her district, opens on schedule.
- Vela's priorities as the newest CM include a \$22-per-hour base wage for EMS - "The people we depend on in our worst days are living on the edge of poverty to help us. We must act now to help them." He wants to bump Cronk's proposed \$18-per-hour

minimum to \$20; hire a permanent lifeguard corps to avoid the shortages we've seen this summer that have kept pools closed during the hottest summer on record; conduct environmental testing in La Grange to gauge impacts of continued operation of the coal-fired Fayette Power Plant; and nearly double Cronk's proposed rental assistance line item, to \$12 million.

• The two CMs running for reelection -Paige Ellis and Natasha Harper-Madison have some interesting targeted asks. Ellis calls out gun violence prevention, which has mostly been championed by Mayor Pro Tem Alison Alter, and also "safe and welcoming streets," which is her own knownfor (Vision Zero, Healthy Streets, lowering neighborhood speed limits). Harper-Madison has taken aim at Cronk's proposed doubling of the parkland dedication fees paid by new residential development, which already more than doubled in the current budget over fiscal 2021. (Because the price of land keeps going up.) "We must be mindful of ensuring that our pursuit of this important goal" - providing adequate public open space – "compliments and supports our housing priorities." She wants to freeze the fees at this year's levels and lock in the fee amount at the time builders submit their site plans, to "provide more predictability for home builders who are faced with the possibility of financially disruptive annual fee hikes during the multi-year process of navigating our existing development processes." The city is also preparing to assess parkland fees on commercial (nonresidential) properties, which should presumably pick up some of this slack.

Via 313 Workers Demand a Slice

On Thursday, Aug. 4, over 75% of workers at three Via 313 locations - Oak Hill. Eastside, and North Campus - filed a petition with the National Labor Relations Board to unionize. The decision comes after almost a year of behind-the-scenes organizing, spurred further by the company's COVID response.

At a rally on Sunday at the North Campus location, organizer **Henry Epperson**, an employee since November 2021, told the Chronicle tensions with management came to a head during the Omicron wave "six or seven months ago. We were all getting COVID, we asked for hazard pay. The company said no" and suspended four workers who petitioned for better communication of **COVID protocols**. Workers protested on Jan. 8 outside the north campus store - "We came out in full force and got them rehired." But since then, workers say, communication has fallen on

Instead of joining an existing union, the workers aim for the newly created **Restaurant Workers United** to be the restaurant industry-specific union for all: "There are a few restaurants that are unionized - hotels or airports that have larger contracts," explains Epperson. "But for us, just normal restaurant workers, we don't

really have a voice to represent us. So we wanted to start our own."

In addition to COVID safety concerns. RWU intends to negotiate around issues with wage theft, scheduling, and benefits. "We're looking at our hours and it's not matching up, people missing hundreds of dollars ... consistently being over- and under-scheduled despite numerous attempts to reach out to management." Union members say the company is more focused on franchising in Utah than preserving the work environment of their flagship Austin stores. "We brought these issues to them as individuals first and then we kind of realized it's better if we stand together, and now they're finally listening to us," says Epperson. JJ, an employee at the Eastside location, says the issues are endemic at the company. "Like my manager specifically, I think that they do a great job. A lot of this stuff is really just above them."

"This industry is something I've been around pretty much my entire life," says Epperson. "So I've seen some of the good things. But I've also seen the darker side. There's definitely a lot of issues with exploitation. So I think we need to organize and fight for our rights within these jobs."

East Austin doesn't get the same shade, and consequences ripple for health and equity

Austinites have been facing a **record-hot summer**, having just endured the hottest May, June, and July on record. August is on track to join those ranks, with an average temperature of 90.5 degrees Fahrenheit as of Wednesday. (That means the average of both daytime and nighttime temps.) Streaks

of triple-digit-degree days have spurred heat advisories, along with increased risk of wildfire and drought.

Many of us can take advantage of air conditioning or the cooling effects of the city's pools and springs. But the city's urban forest also provides major relief from the heat. "Trees absolutely cool the air around them and they provide shade, which also helps cool paved surfaces that tend to store and radiate heat," Emily King,

the **urban forester** for the city of Austin, told the Chronicle.


A good thing, then, that Austin is home to over 33 million trees, which shade over 35% of the city, according to the city's Commun**ity Tree Report**. It notes that Austin's trees contribute more than \$38 million in savings for Austinites every year, including reduced energy costs, carbon sequestration, pollution removal, and avoided health care costs.

But not all trees are distributed equally. A 2021 report by the nonprofit American Forests found Austin's high-income and

low-income neighborhoods have a 20% disparity in canopy coverage - that's the widest gap in the country. (Canopy coverage means having not only more trees but larger and older trees.) "It is not an accident that we see huge discrepancies in the urban tree canopy between the predominantly white west side and predominantly Latinx Black and Eastside," said Dr. Deidre Zoll, a postdoc fellow of integrative biology at UT-Austin.

"The shortest answer is racism."

Alexia Leclercq of longtime Eastside environmental justice advocacy group People Organized in Defense of Earth and her Resources (PODER) agrees. "In addition to bearing the brunt of pollution and

exposure to toxic chemicals, there is less green spaces, less tree coverage, and overall less environmental protection and regulation [in East Austin]," she said. "This leads to discrepancies in the well-being of people living in the area; we know increase in canopy [coverage] is correlated with cooler weather and cleaner air."

Carmen Llanes Pulido, executive director of Go Austin/Vamos Austin (GAVA), works among Austin's Eastern Crescent communities and shared how folks have been dealing with the heat. "People just talk about having to cope with keeping their kids inside a lot of the day, which is rough," she said. "For people who live closer to greenbelts in some of our neighborhoods, it's such a massive difference. The

difference of being in a greenbelt area at 4 or 5pm versus on concrete is night and day."

Urban forests reduce air pollution and flooding while providing shade, cooler temperatures, and space for recreation. This improves things for their neighbors, like rates of asthma and cardiovascular disease, the risk of heat stroke, the cost of air conditioning, the damage caused by flooding, and overall mental health, Zoll added. "One of the starkest differences is that we can see up to a 17-year difference in life expectancy between two census tracts in East and West Austin," she said. "If there are already inequalities in terms of cardiovascular health, more extreme heat events will likely increase the disparities [in] hospitalization, severe illnesses, and mortality."

CITY EXTENDS CONTRACT TO CONTINUE COMPREHENSIVE POLICE REVIEW

City Council voted unanimously at its July 28 meeting on a \$350,000 contract extension with **Kroll Associates**, which will allow the law enforcement consulting firm to work on the third phase of its comprehensive review of the Austin Police Department. "Phase C" of the review will focus on how APD complies with federal and state law and the department's "complaint and grievance procedures concerning allegations of racial and sexual discrimination and harassment in the workplace." It will also evaluate how department leadership handled prior incident investigation reports regarding allegations of workplace discrimination.

Issues with how APD handles internal complaints about workplace culture – in particular, how former Chief **Brian** Manley and his inner circle mishandled claims and evidence of persistent racism from one of their own, former Assistant Chief Justin Newsom - prompted the December 2019 resolution by Council Member Natasha Harper-Madison that called for the work Kroll has been doing. As laid out in a earlier investigation of the matter by attorney

Lisa Tatum, Manley waited for nearly a week after learning of the allegations against Newsom to launch an internal investigation, during which time Newsom retired and cashed out hundreds of thousands of dollars in unused leave - which he would not have been able to do while under investigation.

Kroll expects Phase C of its review to take about six months after it receives the information it needs from APD (it's unclear how long that could take). In addition to workplace culture, the review will look at misconduct incidents over the past decade resulting in lawsuits. "The final report will identify any patterns or trends that suggest disparate outcomes based on ethnicity or race and opportunities for better agency risk management," a July 26 staff memo says of the review. It will also include interviews with APD personnel to get a better sense of what the environment is like "regarding issues of race and gender" and how that impacts women, people of color, and LGBTQIA individuals within the department.

The review will produce more recommendations for APD to implement. Those will include continuing education for all active APD personnel. as part of required biennial recertification as peace officers, that covers implicit bias, de-escalation, and the history of policing and its intersections with race and identity in America. Phase C recommendations will also include some kind of "reputable leadership training" and guidance on how to establish "clear qualification[s]" for assistant chief positions.

Mayor Steve Adler brought an amendment to the contract extension, also approved unanimously. It requires staff to seek bids on a new third-party review of the ongoing effort to revise the curriculum at the Austin police academy "as part of any request to accelerate or increase cadet classes" in the fiscal year 2023 budget, up for approval beginning Aug. 17.

Kroll's review will also include a Phase D, which will look at various communications used by APD personnel - a longstanding goal of local justice advocates. This includes public social media posts (including those made under pseudonyms or anonymously), emails, and text messages on city devices within the past five years. - Austin Sanders

Pulido, an Austin native, has dealt with many long, hot summers. But the heat has gotten much more extreme in recent years, taking a toll on residents' health, she said. "One of our folks in South Austin is a paramedic and EMT for children and talks about how many more children come in with respiratory issues in the emergency room on hot days," she said. "When you're seeing kid after kid after kid, you start thinking about the true cost of pulling up a bunch of heritage or keystone trees or paving over a bunch of green space."

Since 2019, the city has been releasing an annual Community Tree Report - a one-stop source to find out about tree stewardship in Austin, King says. This year's update shows that the city facilitated more than \$1.5 million in urban-forest investment in Austin. Over 10,000 new trees were planted throughout the city, with 64% going to "high priority areas." As you can see on the map at right, high-priority areas are almost entirely east of I-35.

Increased tree planting is encouraging. but still just a drop in the bucket for what needs to be planted to maintain Austin's canopy, King said. "We still lose a ton of trees to natural causes, to drought, [and] to development, and climate impacts are going to be huge to the canopy," she said. "I don't know how we really get to a place where we can even be at a known net loss. So that's a huge challenge."

Pulido says the "Land Development Code wars" are putting Austin's trees at stake. "Trees are an asset in this city, but they also stand in the way of development," she said. "As somebody with lived experience and empirical experience in Austin ... I know that trees are what make this place livable." she said. "And I don't want to be in an Austin without them."

Yes, Alex Jones Was the "Best of Austin" Once

The News Desk was trying very, very hard to pay as little attention as possible to **Alex Jones**, because he and the Chronicle go way back, and really, what else is there to say? As it happened, we got a shout-out from the **InfoWars** impresario as he was undergoing friendly questioning from his latest lawyer (he has fired many), F. Andino Reynal, during his damages trial in the defamation case (which he lost by default) brought by Sandy Hook parents Scarlett Lewis and Neal Heslin. As Texas Monthly's Dan Solomon live-tweeted from District Judge Maya Guerra Gamble's courtroom: "Revnal compares the original [Jones Show on Austin Access TV1 to Wayne's World: Alex likes that comparison. He talks about winning **Best of Austin** awards from The Austin Chronicle back in the '90s."

This was not the only thing Alex Jones said on the stand that was inaccurate! But this error actually sold Jones short: He claimed BOA honors from readers throughout the Aughts, until 2007. We gave him notoriety as Austin's Best Looking Crank in a 1997 Critics Pick, before he 'roided out and became a real-life troll under the bridge. After 2007, when a Democrat was in the White House, is when Jones transitioned from libertarian contrarian to full-on white-power conspiracist, and it was no longer so much fun when he showed up at your outdoor event with a bullhorn.

Anyway, our cameo in the latest chapter of the Alex Jones saga came not long before Lewis and Heslin's attorney Mark Bankston revealed that he was in possession of the entire contents of Jones' cellphone, with texts and emails going back to 2020, which Reynal's office had shared with him by accident and which exposed Jones' many lies under oath, at which point the News Desk had to give in and start paying attention. And when we say "he," we mean "he, and all the other Sandy Hook plaintiffs, since this is only the first of several damages trials in both Texas and Connecticut. and also the January 6 committee, and the U.S. Dept. of Justice." So many things to learn! Among them, we are told, is that Jones had the medical records of each of the Sandy Hook plaintiffs on his phone. (Crime?) We also have now learned that he and **Tucker Carlson** are textin' besties. As we wait for the entire contents of the phone to inevitably leak, we've also learned that the InfoWars enterprise cleared as much as \$300 million in revenue per year, even after Jones got deplatformed from much of his audience for spreading COVID disinfo and helping organize Jan. 6. Difficult Subjects

Post-pandemic, can schools make sex education work?

When the school bell rang for coed sex education class. Lavla Bonnecarrere remembers feeling embarrassed and uncomfortable as she walked into the unknown at Walsh Middle School in Round Rock in 2017. The now 16-year-old junior at Stony Point High said that she would have taken the lessons more seriously if the "Wellness and Sexual Health" curriculum developed by Baylor Scott and White included protection for safer sex, LGBTQ+ orientation, and more lessons in consent.

How students receive and retain sex ed information is crucial in Texas, where teens continue to get pregnant at one of the highest rates in the country, according to 2020 data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Texas has a rate of about 22.4 teen births per 1,000 women age 15-19; the lowest rate is about 6.1 per 1,000, in Massachusetts.

Across the state, middle and elementary school students have been missing out on sex ed from the beginning of the COVID pandemic. Before that, the requirements for what students learn in these classes hadn't been updated in over two decades. The State Board of Education's latest 2020 curriculum standards updated calls for more detailed teaching about birth control and sexually transmitted diseases - but left out the lessons that Bonnecarrere hoped for RRISD spokesperson Maritza Gallaga said the district's sex ed curriculum comes from a collaboration of a School Health Advisory Council and the board of trustees.

"How do you expect kids to take sex education seriously and with respect, when the curriculum is done so poorly?" Bonnecarrere said. "It's hard for others to give respect to a curriculum that doesn't cultivate openness or a sense of diversity."

Bonnecarrere's graduating class still hasn't completed the full sex ed curriculum because their lessons abruptly stopped in eighth grade, during the pandemic. She recalls that most of the lessons up to that point were filled with fear tactics. "There's a lot of romanticization of the married sex life, instead of learning and asking about different points of view on sexual orientation or relationships," she added.

Julia Fensel, a senior at Westlake High School in Eanes ISD, also felt the curriculum she learned was weighted too heavily with warnings about pregnancy and abstinence, when she would've liked to hear conversations about safely exploring

sexuality. Fensel, who serves on the Austin Youth Council to provide a voice for teens and young adults in local government, said she'd like sex ed to focus "more on consent, teaching about birth control, condoms, and other forms of protection. ... Teaching girls that masturbation is normal would also remove the stigma and shame surrounding a very natural part of life for females and teaching students about healthy relationships should also be included."

In October, schools across the state will send out permission slips for parents so they can opt their child out of lessons that they don't feel comfortable with. Stephanie Hebert, Austin ISD's health education curriculum specialist, said she considers how to help teens like Bonnecarrere and Fensel feel comfortable when entering sex ed. An educator with more than 20 years of experience, she now oversees and approves all health and sex education in all K-12 grades in AISD.

Death Watch: Father Forgave, Texas Doesn't

Sarah Walker's dad asked for mercy for her accused killer

Before he passed away in 2021, **Joe Walker** repeatedly expressed his forgiveness for Kosoul Chanthakoummane, the man found guilty of murdering his daughter, Sarah Anne Walker, 14 years earlier in Collin County. Walker spoke about Chanthakoummane in "Witness of Mercy: A Father's Forgiveness," a video produced

by the **Knights of Columbus**. "I don't have any hate towards him at all. I don't want him put to death," Walker said. "I've had others who thought I was just stupid - crazy - for feeling that way. 'Well, aren't you angry?' Sure I'm angry.

I'd be foolish to say I wasn't angry about what happened. But I'm not angry enough to reject the Lord and his teachings ... Our Lord said that the greater the sinner, the more entitled they are to mercy."

At his daughter's funeral, Walker asked the hundreds in attendance to pray for her murderer, whose name he did not yet

know. After Chanthakoummane was arrested, Walker asked the Collin County district attorney not to seek the death penalty. As is often the case, the D.A. disregarded these wishes; Walker read in the newspaper the next morning of the deci-

sion to pursue a death sentence. Chanthakoummane received that sentence in 2007.

In the years since, Chanthakoummane has appealed his conviction on various grounds, particularly the prosecutors' use of hypnosis and bitemark evidence to build their case. Investigators hypnotized two eyewitnesses to help them remember enough detail to create a composite sketch that led to Chanthakoummane. At the trial, a person who billed himself

as an expert in bite mark identification testified that a mark on the victim's neck matched Chanthakoummane's teeth.

Withess hypnosis and bite-mark evidence are now widely regarded as junk science. In 2017, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals stopped a planned execution of Chanthakoummane to hear arguments that the discredited practices had tainted his trial. They ruled in October 2020 that the bitemark evidence amounted to false testimony but that its omission would not have changed the trial's outcome. As for the

> use of hypnosis, the judges said its limitations were well understood at the time of the trial, so the testimony was admissible. Today, the introduction

of such evidence would be strongly challenged by any competent defense attorney.

Death penalty opponents continue to argue that the hypnosis and bite mark testimony calls Chanthakoummane's conviction into question. "We are not prepared to say today that he is innocent, but we are here to say that there are some real questions," said Abraham Bonowitz, executive director of **Death Penalty** Action, at an Aug. 3 news conference. The advo-

cates are asking the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles for a stay of execution. If none is granted, Chanthakoummane will be killed on Aug. 17. - Brant Bingamon

Hebert said her team decided to include scenarios in the district's supplemental sex education material that were inclusive of LGBTQ+ students, but that they are not addressing abortion. "We as a team are very thoughtful about making sure that students feel as comfortable as possible when discussing sex," she said, "and we make sure there are things like anonymous question boxes and that lessons are activity- and peer conversation-heavy.

"One of the things that I hear a lot from teachers is the need for students to be serious about this content, but this content is hard for adults, too," Hebert added. "As adults, we get in there and start making jokes and laughing, and it doesn't mean that we don't take it seriously – you don't have to talk about STDs with a straight face, you can laugh your way through the conversation. We're all trying to figure out how to navigate these things in a world and culture that tells us that we're not supposed to."

Like Round Rock, Austin has also faced the challenges of not teaching sex education consistently before and during the COVID pandemic, according to Hebert, who noted that AISD worked a lengthy process in 2019 to get new sexuality curricula approved by the board of trustees. This included hearings that were thronged with "Concerned Parents" mobilized by the social-conservative pressure group Texas Values, and rewriting materials that originally came from a Planned Parenthood affiliate in Massachusetts, which the Texas Legislature made impermissible in 2019.

Education contractors, or curriculum specialists such as Hebert, train teachers in the state's sex ed curriculum every year. Because there's nothing in the Texas Education Code that prevents teachers from answering

student questions on topics outside of the state standards, Hebert said that classrooms can talk about abortion and LGBTQ+ sexuality and orientation – but there's a catch. While teachers are trained to anticipate questions outside of their curriculum, they don't have to answer every question. If they feel uncomfortable with a question, sex ed teachers can choose to refer students to seek answers elsewhere. (And that referral can be as broad as the word "elsewhere.")

Bonnecarrere said that when their questions aren't answered, most of her peers search for answers on the internet, and she fears that's a reason for misinformation around sex and continued confusion. "It's hard to feel safe when you're encouraged to ask questions, but most of the time you're met with the response that they're not at the liberty to answer and that we need to talk to our parents," Bonnecarrere said. "A lot of us don't go home and have healthy conversations [about sex] because it's stigmatized or embarrassing."

Imelda Mejia, communications director at the Texas Freedom Network, said many students don't have parents who are equipped or willing to talk to them about sex and health. The nonprofit found that Texas teens have higher-than-average rates of HIV and STD infections, and that more than 1 in 7 female and 1 in 16 male high school students reported experiencing sexual violence in 2017.

"Right now we're seeing an attempt to censor what's being taught and it's in the form of history. We saw a lot of people during textbook revisions trying to keep scientific information away from textbooks," Mejia said. "It's concerning how much critical information will be available to students that they'll need to learn for the rest of their lives."

Uprooted community grieves for neighbor, neighborhood

Trouble had been brewing for months at the Congress Mobile Home Park between Stassney and William Cannon in far south Austin when Maria Rosie Muñoz heard a knock at her door. It was the property manager telling her she was being evicted. She had 60 days to vacate the premises. "I was in shock," Muñoz said. "It took me a week to digest it and just - where was I going? What was I going to do? I honestly couldn't afford to transition into an apart-

ment complex. I live within my means."

Muñoz was left scrambling. The mobile home park she'd lived at for five years was purchased in December by Pavdar Properties, a multibillion-dollar La Jolla, Calif.-based real estate investment and management firm with a "specific focus on investments in undervalued and distressed properties." By July 1, the last residents were told they needed to clear out. Muñoz has since relocated her RV to

a park on East Ben White Boulevard - and though her housing expenses have increased by \$500 per month, living miles farther away from her job as a cashier at Lowe's and her neighborhood, she still thinks she's one of the lucky ones.

Muñoz had only lived at the park for years, not decades. Her RV was movable. And while she couldn't stay in her neighborhood, she did manage to stay in Austin. Not all of her neighbors are having similar success. "Some of these homes have been there longer than 30 years, so ... they're weathered, and you can't put them on the highway to move," she said. "Maybe the flooring is not very good, the framing is not very good - it's good just staying put, but put it

on the highway? No."

The precarity of the looming evictions hit home on July 23, when Greg Hopkins, a resident struggling to find a new place to live, died at his home in the park. Community members held a vigil for him last week. The park's community has long been tight-knit, partially because of the longevity of many of its members, and partially because it has had to be. Residents formed a tenant association to fight against dis-

placement in 2019 and were successful. This struggle, however, has proven more challenging. The new owner is not seeking to rezone the property, but just to replace the current tenants with higher-paying ones - giving the current residents little

legal recourse against displacement. Residents have continued to organize, but Paydar's chairman has refused to meet with them. "He doesn't like the look of those trailers," Gabby Garcia of Building and Strengthening Tenant Action (BASTA) said of Paydar CEO Reza Paydar. "He saw these people as disposable."

City Council Member Vanessa Fuentes, who attended the vigil, noted that Austin passed an ordinance in 2016 requiring that developers evicting low-income tenants would have to pay into a relocation fund, but its implementation was blocked by the state of Texas. "It's an example of mass displacement that is happening, and another

example of how the state preempts municipalities from intervening in situations like this," Fuentes said. She said she's looking at introducing a budget amendment on tenant relocation support along with a potentially broader mobile home preservation strategy, but that the clock is ticking with people being displaced daily.

Muñoz said she was intent on staying in Austin after her eviction from the park. even as her daughter urged her to relocate to San Antonio. But she said she's increasingly concerned about what the city she moved to in 1996 is becoming. "We're not going to have rooted people," she said. "We can't afford it."

TEXAS IS BURNING AND THERE'S NO END IN SIGHT, YET

As Travis, Hays, and Blanco counties remain in severe to extreme states of drought, the number of brush fires and wildfires raging is hard to accurately count. Since last Tuesday, Aug. 2, three large wildfires and countless smaller brush fires have burned thousands of acres, causing evacuations and destroying properties around the Austin metro area. Most of those fires are 95%-100% contained as of press time, but new ones are starting all the time. Multiple task forces with firefighters from all three counties fought the fires along with the Texas A&M Forest Service and Texas Army National Guard.

The Smoke Rider fire in Hays and Blanco county burned 1,210 acres, jumped U.S. Highway 290 near Dripping Springs, closed down that highway and FM 165, and caused evacuations including that of 50-plus dogs and cats from the

PAWS Shelter of Central Texas. Pedernales Falls State Park closed temporarily on Aug. 3, and according to Blanco County emergency managers, Smoke Rider burned seven

homes along with barns, vehicles, and other equipment. The Hermosa fire in Hays County, so far having burned 44 acres, forced people to evacuate their homes off FM 3237 and River Mountain Road on August 4. The Blue Bluff fire - the closest to Austin, in eastern Travis County - burned 60 acres starting July 29 and on Aug. 2 breached containment lines, causing the Texas Music Ranch to evacuate. The Big Sky fire, sustained by 25 mph wind gusts in Gillespie County near Fredericksburg, burned almost 1,500 acres south of Enchanted Rock State Natural Area, which also had to close for a time - and these are just the ones large enough to be named. On Tuesday, Aug. 9, alone, the Forest Service responded to 26 wildfires for 1,276 acres in the state.

Though the ongoing drought is making conditions worse, 90% of wildfires in Texas are caused by humans, according to the Forest Service. Half start with either debris burning (which shouldn't be happening due to widespread burn bans) or

equipment such as chains dragging when pulling a trailer, which sparked the Blue Bluff fire on July 29. Discarded cigarette butts don't help, says the Austin Fire Department. A small reprieve may come this week in the form of slight rain chances, but Texas remains in a severe and long-lasting drought, with "no long term improvement in fuel dryness anticipated," according - Lina Fisher to the Forest Service.

Case numbers are low, but so is vaccine supply

On the heels of President Joe Biden's Aug. 4 declaration of monkeypox as a public health emergency, Austin Public Health and Central Health hosted their first official town hall on the disease Friday, Aug. 5. Austin Mayor Steve Adler and Travis County Judge Andy Brown subsequently declared it a public health emergency Tuesday, Aug. 9, and City Council is considering declaring a local disaster at today's meeting. For now, resources are low, but local officials hope the declaration will help garner more vaccines and emergency funds.

Travis County has seen 9 confirmed and 59 presumptive cases of monkeypox as of press time. There are 702 confirmed cases in Texas as a whole (mostly in Dallas); of those, 9 are women and 2 are children.

Although monkeypox can present like COVID-19 initially – fever, body aches, fatigue – it is harder to spread and

less severe. Monkeypox has also been compared to HIV, as 98% of cases are among men who have sex with men, but officials stress that it is not an STI, and the disease could spread to anyone. Unlike both COVID and HIV, monkeypox is "self-limited," meaning 99% of people recover without treatment or hospitalization.

As for testing, APH currently has no communitywide initiative similar to COVID testing sites planned. APH advises symptomatic people to call their health care provider or APH's health equity line. "Because


of the areas that need to be swabbed [the sore itself], it's a little more nuanced, and not as easy as setting up a station to swab your nose," Health Authority Dr. **Desmar Walkes** said. Complicating things further, results must be sent to the **U.S. Centers for Disease Control** for confirmation.

The area's vaccine supply is also low. APH asked for 5,000 doses from the Texas **Department of State Health Services** but only received 3,000. Because the city aims to give recipients two doses 28 days apart, this batch will only serve 1,500 patients. The two-

dose approach and the city's chosen priority groups differ from other cities fighting the spread. San Francisco and Los Angeles prioritize giving the first dose to as many people as possible, waiting on second doses until supplies exist. For eligibility, APH's priority is people who have been exposed to a known case in the last 14 days, then those who have had mul-

tiple sex partners in places with monkeypox. APH says it has to follow the state and CDC guidelines, but cities including San Francisco, Los Angeles, and New York are prioritizing vaccinating queer people "who have sex with men, who have had more than 1 sexual partner in the past 14 days," regardless of known exposure to the virus.

Frustrations on the ground are swelling. **Jeremy Stilb**, marketing manager at sexual health clinic **ASHwell**, says many in Austin's LGBTQ+ community are confused about vaccine eligibility, and about why cities

including Dallas received more doses. "What should be happening," says Stilb, "is that people that are self-identifying as being at risk, which is men that sleep with men and have multiple partners, they should be the ones prioritized for the vaccine." Stilb says the lag time between ruling out other diseases and receiving treatment is also frustrating to people whose painful symptoms worsen in the interim, and that some would like to receive **TPOXX**, aka **tecovirimat**, a possible treatment that the **FDA** has yet to approve for monkeypox.

"A lot of the people in these decision-making positions – these are abstract issues to them. And for someone like me, it's like, I feel at risk, my friends are at risk. This is a very palpable fear." Stilb says, right now, "I don't like preaching abstinence, but unfortunately, I think that's what's going to work until there's more access to vaccines." Vivent Health's Dr. Aliza Norwood agreed: "I think this is just going to be another conversation [with] sexual partners who you may not know about, kind of like we've had to do dating with COVID."

Five Monkeypox Questions Answered

We spoke to Dr. Sandra Guerra, chief medical officer for Texas Health Action, and Austin Public Health to answer some of the most pressing questions about monkeypox.

What are monkeypox symptoms?

Flulike symptoms may precede a rash. Rashes, lesions, or sores, which look like pimples can appear. Monkeypox is rarely fatal, but more severe cases have been reported in the immunocompromised, pregnant people, and children under 8.

How could I get monkeypox?

Monkeypox is overwhelmingly spread by **prolonged skin-to-skin contact** with an infectious rash or sore,

mostly during sex. It can also be spread via kissing, drink-sharing, and towels or clothes that contact infectious rashes. Though 98% of cases have been found in men, in Dr. Guerra's words, "Anyone who is human may be at risk."

What should I do if I have symptoms?

Avoid close contact with other people and contact your health care provider. If you don't have one, call APH's equity line – 512/972-5560 – for info on testing, vaccines, and treatment. If you have a rash or sore, keep it covered to avoid spreading. Laundering sheets and towels will sufficiently disinfect them. The illness (and isolation period) lasts 2-4 weeks, or until scabs from sores fall off.

Who can get vaccinated?

As of July 29, APH has enough vaccine doses for **1,500 people**. Travis County is prioritizing people who were exposed to a known case in the last 14 days, then people who have had multiple sexual partners in Travis County in the last 14 days.

How is monkeypox different from COVID-19?

It's harder to spread and we have access to treatments and vaccinations, unlike the beginning of the COVID pandemic. Monkeypox is only contagious when an infected person is symptomatic, and the risk of reinfection is low. Similarly to COVID, controlling outbreaks early can prevent mutations.



EGREAT DIVIDE

When India and Pakistan split into two countries, it reshaped world history. Now Austin podcaster Neha Aziz records the personal stories behind that severing in Partition.

Imagine waking up and being told that you, your friends, your family, have a month to pack up and move across the country. Not just that, but when you get to whatever destination you're assigned, you'll be a citizen of a new nation, and the border will close behind vou forever.

This is what happened in 1947, when the collapsing British empire cut its occupied lands in South Asia into two states, India and Pakistan. Known as "partition," it was a landmark event in 20th-century geopolitics, but also a wellspring of personal stories, many tragic and untold. It's those stories that Austin writer and podcaster Neha Aziz has recorded 75 years later for her new series for I Heart Media simply titled Partition.

Even though she has lived most of her life in Texas, in many ways Aziz still sees herself as Pakistani. Born in Karachi, her family moved to Arlington when she was child, but she was raised in the culture and language of the nation

of her birth. She said, "I didn't grow up eating meatloaf and mashed potatoes. When we weren't eating a rice dish, we were eating something with naan." At the same time, she was also very aware of not trying to stand out in her very white suburb. "Being a Muslim

in the South, being 11 when September 11 happened, I wasn't really like, 'Let's look at my culture!""

It wasn't until she attended UT-Austin as an undergrad and joined a South Asian sorority that she found herself in a more diverse community. Then, in 2017 she took her first trip back to Pakistan since childhood, and like so many people when they find themselves among family and friends, she went to the mall. In the upscale waterfront Dolmen Mall Clifton, she got a surprise history lesson. There was an interactive installation, "Home1947," by the two-time Oscar-winning documentarian Sharmeen Obaid-Chinov. It was an eye-opening experience for Aziz. "I always knew about partition," she said, "but I didn't know about the absolute terror." She suddenly learned about the tens of millions of people suddenly forced to pick a side, to abandon their homes and friends, then travel east or west through violent mobs that could rape or slaughter them for their faith or their accent. Some were lucky enough to find a home; many others spent years in refugee camps. It was a history that she'd never seen before, and that she realized most Americans had never known, "especially if your education was done in Texas, where all of mine was. ... I feel like when I was in school the only thing that was touched upon was Gandhi."

But this wasn't about educational failures. Aziz said she realized that she was

> part of a generation whose parents and grandparents went through partition but never talked about it. That's something she sees as especially common in Asian cultures, to just not discuss traumatic events. She pointed to Lulu Wang's semi-autobiographical film The Farewell. "Their grand-

mother's sick and everyone's like, 'No one tell her." But nondisruptive silence wasn't going to work for her. After visiting the exhibition, she said, "we go to the food court for lunch, and we're eating KFC, and I'm waving a chicken strip going, 'What is this? Tell me about it?"

However, the questioning was not accusatory. She called the process, and the podcast it would become, "atonement, in a way. I never really looked into my culture in my adolescence, and my grandparents

on my dad's side lived with us in Texas for a few years. I didn't know about partition, but I didn't ask them what their lives were like." She quickly realized that, seven decades after partition, the window to talk to people who lived through it was closing. "My grandfather was 14 [then], he's 89 now and his memory isn't great. My grandma lived through partition and she then also lived through the 1971 Liberation War in Bangladesh. ... She doesn't want to talk to me about those things, and she may not remember them now."

That life-changing mall trip left Aziz questioning the underpinnings of the identity that she had taken for granted, and the connections to her heritage. She said, "I was born in Pakistan, and my parents were born there, but all of my grandparents and all of my other relatives and ancestors were born in India." Yet with the constant simmering border conflicts between the two nations, because she is from Pakistan, "I won't get to go to see my grandparents' house." Equally, while she'd grown up aware of "this innate Indians versus Pakistanis thing" that has colored global politics for the last 75 years, and even though India is seeing a resurgence of Hindu nationalism that makes it even less likely she will be able to visit, "our food and language and general sense are cut from the same cloth."

It was a story that continued to fascinate Aziz, even if she wasn't quite sure how to tell it. At a loose end during the pandemic, she pitched the project to I Heart Media through their NextUp Initiative for

underrepresented voices and was accepted into it "right before my 31st birthday." She called the program "a little bit of a bootcamp, a six-month fellowship [where] they would teach you the ropes of podcasting. And what's great is that it was paid, so I was paid to do the research."

But that research was brutal and born of often horrible personal experiences from survivors, many of them in their 70s, 80s, even 90s. Like the former Rutgers economics lecturer tearing up as he talked for 21/2 hours about losing family, or the Stanford professor who can't smell barbecue without being reminded of the smoke from burning bodies. And there were the stories from her own family, from her own grandfather, with whom she finally talked about it: about his nearly 700-mile sea voyage from his home in Bombay (now Mumbai) to a new life in Karachi, about how his sister was born on the day of partition - August 15, 1947. "So there's all this stuff happening, and there's a kid being born."

Another realization: If that great-aunt had been born a month earlier, she would have been Indian. "My grandparents were teenagers when this happened. What if they decided to stay, or leave and attempt to come back – which many people thought they could, but didn't. What if they wanted to convert? Your life can change with a handful of decisions, but I feel like, for this, it's really, really true."

A Brief History of the Creation of India and Pakistan

1526 Babur, Amir of Ferghana, defeats Ibrahim Lodi. Sultan of Delhi, at the first Battle of Panipat. and establishes the Mughal Empire. By 1700. his descendants have expanded the empire to control most of South Asia.

1600 The British East India Company is founded in London. Nominally a mercantile shipping firm, granted a royal monopoly on all trade with South Asia, it is little more than a front for British imperial ambitions and becomes a militaristic invading force for the next 200 years.

1757 After defeating the army of the Nawab of Bengal at the Battle of Plessey, the British East India Company becomes the de facto government of India, either through military force or agreements with the over 500 principalities in the region.

1857 The Great Rebellion: A broad alliance of Indian forces ally against Company rule but are viciously suppressed, Mughal Emperor Bahadur Shah Zafar is dethroned and exiled, ending the Mughal Empire.

1858 The British Parliament passes the Government of India Act 1858, placing the nation under direct control of the British monarchy.


1866 Muslim philosopher and political theorist Syed Ahmad Khan proposes the two-nation theory, that Indian Muslims and Hindus are too culturally divided to coexist if the occupying British forces ever withdraw.

1874 The East India Company is dissolved. 1876 Queen Victoria is declared Empress of India.

1919 In the wake of World War I. Parliament passes the Government of India Act 1919. expanding Indian control of its own government in limited areas.

1937 Parliament passes the Government of India Act 1935, establishing Burma (now Myanmar) and Aden (southern Yemen) as separate colonies.

1947 Worn down by World War II, with British public sentiment turning against the idea of empire and calls from some Indian leaders to adopt the two-nation theory. Parliament passes the Indian Independence Act, ending British rule and creating two states: the Muslim Dominion of Pakistan and the Hindu Union of India (the latter also intended to be a homeland for the region's Sikhs). The act receives royal assent on July 18 and takes effect August 15. With only days of warning, millions of people are forced to flee for fear of their lives, and the arbitrary borders are so contentious that within a year, India and Pakistan are at war over Kashmir, a conflict that simmers to this day. 1971 Bengali nationalists in East Pakistan launch the Liberation War after police fire on protesters calling for recognition of Bengali as an official language. The region achieves independence and become Bangladesh.



Map of the Mughai Empire, 1700





Review: Austin Playhouse's Previews of Departing Attractions

LOWELL BARTHOLOMEE'S LATEST COLLECTION OF SHORT PLAYS WAS WORTH THE 20-YEAR WAIT BY BOB ABELMAN

It's been 20 years since playwright (and actor/ director/designer) Lowell Bartholomee gathered, and this publication reviewed, a collection of his short works. The Blue Theater playbill described that production - with the self-deprecating title Blah, Blah, Blah - as "seven sharp shorts and more, featuring B sides and previously unreleased material." The Austin Chronicle noted that the writing "blazes like a klieg instrument throwing some gritty metrosphere of modern life into stark relief. Make that stark comic relief."

Expect more of the same in Previews of Departing Attractions, the world premiere production of 10 new and revisited archival works by Bartholomee. Their curation was commissioned by the Austin Playhouse to serve as the opening production Previews of Departing Attractions for its interim West Campus Austin Plavhouse, 405 W. 22nd.

performance space. This collection reflects the auteur's trademark wit and engaging intelligence, and each story is (for the most

part) thematically linked to the others by its focus on loss - from the pandemic ("This Is Fine"), from old age ("Smiley"), from cancer ("Standing Room Only"), from the pending apocalypse ("Mono no Aware"), and from the shift in Austin's culture as it transitions from weird college town to bustling metropolis (there's a bonus video that memorializes the city's lost playhouses, including the Blue Theater).

The reason for the vicennial gap between anthology productions like these, says Bartholomee on the Austin Playhouse website, is that "my work ethic as far as writing goes has never been everything it could be." Perhaps. But veiled behind each simple story - which offers a mere slice of life or a snapshot moment in time – is the laborious, time-consuming task of creating that illusion of simplicity. Clearly, Bartholomee works hard at making the mundane intriguing ("Game Day"), the inane brimming with cleverness ("One Small Step"), and the depressing flat-out funny

("Bob's Birthday"). He manages to discover just the right word, the most powerful turn of a phrase, the perfectly clandestine punchline, and find their proper placement in a 10- to 15-minute piece of storytelling. It's not easy or expeditious to make each play unfold with impeccable fluidity and end with such astounding and unexpected poignancy.

Bartholomee, the director, employs some tricks of the trade to best showcase his work. He uses set design (Lara Toner Haddock and Mike Toner) modestly – with a piece of furniture to establish a sense of place and video images on three sizable screens around the performance space to provide context - so that, without set changes, one play can seamlessly bleed into the next and provide the

desired emotional ebb and flow. There is no intermission. And he brings the performance of several plays out into the audience and allows his actors to work the room. Natalie George and Sadie Langenkamp's lighting design and Buffy Manners' costume

design are used effectively but minimally.

The ensemble consists of actors with a history with the playwright, as well as those he met during the recent ScriptWorks Out of Ink 23rd annual 10-minute play showcase at Hyde Park Theatre. Collectively, Juleeane Andrea, Kareem Badr, Zac Carr, Marina DeYoe-Pedraza, David DuBose, Sarah Chong Harmer, and Robert S. Fisher have mastered the delivery of the playwright's smart dialogue and its employment of overlapping talk and cut-off half-sentences. Individually, their skills and the plays they're in reflect a perfect goodness of fit, as if the works were written for them.

An evening filled with Bartholomee's unique brand of short storytelling should not be missed. Too bad they only surface with the same infrequency as cicadas.



The Eye in Dallas is upon you. As you walk down Main Street through the concrete canyons of downtown, a 30-foot eye stares from a gated lawn.

The fiberglass-and-steel bloodshot eyeball with a sky-blue iris does its part to keep Dallas weird.

The larger-than-life eye debuted in 2010 by artist Tony Tasset for the Chicago Loop Alliance's Art Loop program. Among Tasset's many other public art installations is a giant copy of his wife's hand on the grounds of Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio.

Dallas-based businessman **Timothy Headington** brought the ocular art to the lot across the street from his swanky Joule hotel in 2013. Since then the fenced lawn has hosted weddings, private parties, the Dallas Art Fair's Eye Ball, and served as background for countless selfies

Over the years folks have guessed at the artist's intended meaning of the art that used his own eye as a model. On the hotel's website, Tasset is quoted as saying the piece means "whatever you want."

In the heart of downtown Dallas, the Joule is known for decorating the public spaces of the former bank building with artwork by famous artists. Headington, who made his fortune in the oil and gas industry, holds an undergraduate degree in history from the University of Oklahoma.



Eye is set back from the street at 1601 Main St. between Akard and Ervay streets. Two blocks away is the AT&T Discovery District, another downtown landmark. The conglomerate of dining and entertainment opportunities surrounds a green space. The pocket park is watched over by Spirit of Communication, a gold statue that once towered over Broadway in New York City.

Best Appreciate Our All-Star While We've Got Him

Austin, this is a public service announcement. Appreciate Sebastián Driussi while you can.

Cherish every moment. Admire every precise pass. Enjoy every outrageous dribble. Celebrate every spectacular goal. A special player is having a special season, and he's doing it in Austin's backyard. Q2 Stadium has fully caught on, too, serenading "El Crack" with chants of "M-V-P, M-V-P" after he scored twice in Austin FC's latest match, a thrilling 3-3 draw against the San Jose Earthquakes over the weekend.

The simple fact is: Driussi has been the best men's soccer player in North America this season. And yes, that includes his counterparts in Mexico's Liga MX, whom he faced Wednesday evening (as the *Chronicle* was going to press) as part of the second annual MLS All-Stars vs. Liga MX All-Stars exhibition match in Minneapolis. Driussi is the first player in Austin FC history to earn All-Star honors, which is applauseworthy by itself but comes nowhere close to fully appreciating the season that Austin's Argentine maestro is putting together.

"He continues to demonstrate why he deserves [MVP consideration]," Austin FC head coach Josh Wolff said last week. "Sebastián makes players around him better. His intensity, his responsibility, his maturity is always on display."

The numbers tell a compelling story. After Saturday's brace, Driussi (a midfielder) leads all MLS players in goals with 16. With 10 matches remaining in the 2022 regular season, he's on pace to finish with 23, which would be the most by any MLS player since 2019 and the most ever by a midfielder. He's also on pace for 10 assists, which puts him on track to join one of the league's most exclusive clubs. The list of players with a 20-goal, 10-assist season to their name in MLS history is as follows: Carlos Vela, Zlatan Ibrahimović, Diego Valeri, Sebastian Giovinco. That's three league MVPs and a global mega-star (who was MVP runner-up that season). Driussi still has work to do to turn that foursome into a


fierce five, but so far nothing appears likely to slow him down.

And then there's the eye test: the things you can't fully appreciate unless you watch them unfold, ideally in the flesh. Driussi radiates confidence. He scores goals in important moments, and is one of the biggest reasons why Austin FC finds itself firmly entrenched among the league's elite, playoff-bound squads.

Recently, Driussi's teammate Ruben Gabrielsen poured some cold water on my theory that Driussi could start for just about any club in the world right now. But that's why the fit in Austin has been so perfect. A player of Driussi's skill set – eagle-eyed vision, top-class playmaking ability, elite finishing from anywhere around the box – is at its best when made the central focal point of an attack. Those roles are tough to come by, especially among Europe's Champions League regulars. But the 26-year-old has that role on lockdown in Josh Wolff's employ, and is showing week in and week out what he can do with it.

How soon until one of those big clubs across the pond decides to offer him the keys to their proverbial car, shiny and exotic as it may be? And how will he react if that happens? Better for Verde fans not to think that far ahead. Just enjoy the ride while it lasts.

True Love Will Find You in the End

Dale Dickey delivers a career-best depiction of patience and hope in A Love Song By RICHARD WHITTAKER

There's no such thing as a hopeless romantic. Hope is what romance is built on, the hope that you'll find the person who fills that missing part of your life, or warms something in you, or just makes the dull

roar of the world go away. There's definitely nothing hopeless in the achingly optimistic performance by Dale Dickey in A Love Song, a rare and beautiful portrait of clinging to the promise of romance even if it seems impossible.

In films as diverse as Palm Springs and Winter's Bone, Dickey's face has become filmmaking shorthand for a certain kind of weather-worn, West-to-Midwest, workingclass life lived hard. But that's the kind of life that, when you're trying to put on a prestige

Oscar-bait movie about the trials of folk that get mutteringly dubbed "white trash," you cast as the supporting character or in a background role, like highly skilled set dressing. It's borderline

> criminal that she's never had the opportunity to hold a film by herself, and she does that right from the first moments of A Love Song. As Faye, she has had a life, one likely of more downs than ups, and that's how she's ended up camped out by a lakeside in Colorado, catching crawdads,

drinking coffee, waiting on the mail (she's remote enough that it's delivered on horseback) and for a particular letter. One that she hopes is coming, but she doesn't know will, one from old flame Lito (the equally iconic Studi).

even if South by Southwest award-winning director Max Walker-Silverman undoubtedly indulges the audience in some playfulness (there's a running joke about an engine that dances on the edge of silliness but stays on the charming side). Dickey and Studi together are bashful and tender. kindling ready to reignite a spark that's glowed within them for decades. However, this implies that this is a duet, and wonderful as Studi is as the flower-bearing Godot, finally turning up, this is Dickey's film. Stripped down to her simplest wants, Faye is a naked soul with a life thoroughly lived, not sure whether she's pulling on the past or crafting a new future in what little time she has left. There's no ticking clock of disease or any such artificial motivator: She's just at that age when chances don't come along very often. Dickey understands that Faye doesn't have time for regret, even as she sits by an empty lake, talking to herself, naming birds, trapping crawdads, and watching for the mail. That's not something to regret, or time wasted. That's hope.

A Love Song doesn't deal in glib platitudes,

And that's A Love Song. It is beautiful, quiet, tender, and borne aloft by that rejection of the idea of hopelessness. You don't have to believe in one particular romance, it whispers, to still believe in romance.

BODIES BODIES BODIES

D: Halina Reiin. (R. 95 min.)

The premise for Bodies Bodies Bodies is simple: What if Clue was made with Gen Z?

Trapped in a giant mansion during a hurricane, a group of girls and their significant others all decide to play an intensely spooky game in the same vein as Mafia (the titular Bodies Bodies Bodies), leading to heightened suspicion and a lot of pointing fingers when one of the crew is found dead outside. Bodies Bodies Bodies is a quippy, electric, fun house of a film and a firm case that beloved boutique distributor A24 is truly buying into the brand of Gen Z's hyperaware, sleazy, glitter-punched aesthetic.

The cast for the film is unreal, starring a slew of trendy up-and-coming young women who are all on the verge of being the most sought- after talent in Hollywood, Borat Subsequent Moviefilm star and Oscar-nominated actress Maria Bakalova leads the film as Bee, fresh in love with Sophie (Amandla Stenberg, The Hunger Games' Rue). Bakalova is next-level in the film as a mousy, shy girl who just wants to impress her new girlfriend's oldest friends. She stutters and nervously laughs her way into the group's hesitant welcoming of her, a brilliant showcase that her previous awards buzz wasn't a fluke -Bakalova is a chameleon onscreen.

Not to be overlooked, Chase Sui Wonders plays the self-involved, dramatic Emma, who can cry on a whim to earn sympathy, a funny performance that is reminiscent of her work on HBO's underappreciated Generation. Perhaps the biggest standout, though, is Shiva Baby's Rachel Sennott, who is just as sharp and witty as she was in her breakout film. Bodies Bodies Bodies relies on the chemistry of all its actors to bounce iokes off each other, scream in unison when things get intense, and cultivate suspicion. Sennott attacks the part with the energy of a Seth Rogen comedy, a boisterous quality that elevates one-liners, and the physicality of her performance makes her the star of almost every scene.

The slow unraveling of trust throughout Bodies Bodies feeds into the movie's tension, revealing the rust and decay of this particular group of close-knit female friends. They trauma-dump on each other through tears and blood, clawing away at the cracks that have formed in their bonds over the years. Buried texts, cruel jabs told in confidence, and toxic emotions all bubble up until they boil over. The dramatic chaos feeds into the film's energy and heightens the stakes of the mystery.

And while it's all fun and games until someone gets stabbed in the neck with a rusty antique sword, the film's pressure gauge of tension starts to dwindle toward the end. Character motivations are revealed through hoarse screams, scrambles for weapons are a little too visually haywire, and confessions hit harder in the beginning than they do toward the end. Bodies Bodies Bodies slightly fizzles out like



a party game that's gone on too long, but fortunately it doesn't sputter out too much. A fun, inverted single-location thrill ride, director Halina Reijn creates one rainbow swirl of a good time.

EMILY THE CRIMINAL

D: John Patton Ford. (R, 93 min.)

There are few things as satisfying as watching Aubrey Plaza go off on a potential employer during a job interview. This happens twice in Emily the Criminal, and those scenes offer a catharsis for anyone who has had to endure the string of banal queries meant to assess labor potential. In the first one, the opening scene of John Patton Ford's directorial debut, she withholds a felony conviction, and ends up being removed from the premises. There's an anger, a frustration driving Plaza's Emily, a woman saddled with 70 grand in student debt for an art degree she never completed. Working as an "independent contractor" for a food catering company, she spends her shifts delivering mass lunches to faceless office park companies, the employees hovering like jackals in business attire as Emily arranges travs of food. Everyone's existential dread is palpable: Emily's, the office workers', but especially Ford's, who renders these scenes with clear disdain. When a co-worker gives her a contact for some extra cash, Emily begins her adventure into black mar-

Emily the Criminal moves then from the cul-desacs of dead-end employment to the increasingly treacherous world of credit card fraud, a world introduced to her by Youcef (Theo Rossi, who ever since his epically tragic run as Juice in Sons of Anarchy has the "cluelessly forlorn" thing down pat). Emily catches on quite quickly, going from buying big-ticket items with the stolen credit cards provided to manufacturing the cards herself. When her criminal enterprises inevitably lead to violence, Emily channels her hostility into a committed determination, unafraid of the wet work.

That Emily's anger is not parsed out or explained by some traumatic origin story is one of the pleasant surprises in this neorealist crime drama. A narrative thread involving her more successful childhood friend Liz (Megalyn Echikunwoke) attempting to place Emily into the ad agency that employs her (as an intern, of course) further cements the bitterness that surrounds her. A bitterness many of us are well acquainted with. And while turning to a life of crime to get out of debt isn't the most original concept, Ford's decision to keep his camera on Emily's face for most of the film elevates the material, for Plaza's performance is the draw here. Her Emily is mad as hell and not going to take it anymore, and there's a steely, unapologetic gaze in those huge brown eyes of hers. Plaza's trademark twinkle remains, here cast with a crimson hue.

Summer Stock Goes to the Movies

The youth troupe's new film How to Musical Theatre brings back that MGM song-and-dance style

Say the word "musical" and you automatically think either "Broadway" or "MGM." Since its founding in 2005, youth theatre group Summer Stock Austin has given hundreds of young performers and technicians their moment in some of the Great White Way's finest titles. This weekend, the nonprofit lights up the silver screen as a throwback to the glory days of On the Town and Anchors Away with How to Musical Theatre, a movie homage debuting in a special fundraising screening for Pease Park Conservancy.

Written and produced by Emmy winners Damon Brown and Allen Robertson (known to a generation of kids as Tiny Scarecrow and Buford Biscuit from beloved PBS series The Biscuit Brothers), it follows Marvin (Wilkes Goodner) into a Technicolor place where the rules of musicals apply. Fortunately, he has Kelly (Morgan Lewis), O'Connor (Noah Wood), and Reynold (Alyssa Hurtado) to help him get adjusted – and yes, those names are a nod to Gene, Donald, and Debbie, the stars of Singin' in the Rain.

The jump to film is part of two years of change at Summer Stock, which has become, alongside professional development program the Texas Arts Project and the Heller Awards for Young Artists, part of the newly founded Impact Arts. The intention of the organization is to set young Austinites on a path to a career in musical theatre, and Impact Arts co-founder Donalven Thigpen (himself a Summer Stock alum) said that the movie is just opening another door. He said, "So many musicals are being made into films, it's so cool for the kids to be able to see that, 'Oh, I can still use this skill set."

In 2020, like much of the theatre world, Summer Stock went online with Cyber Stock: a selection of short films created by the 40

students who were supposed to do Summer Stock that year, topped and tailed by musical numbers by J. Quinton Johnson. "That was our first jump to digital," said Summer Stock founder and Impact Arts co-founder and Artistic Director Ginger Morris. The pandemic had eased enough in 2021 that the troupe was able to return to live performance with a production of Lin-Manuel Miranda's Bring It On: The Musical at the McCullough Theatre on the UT campus, but they'd got the filmmaking bug. Across last summer they made Scout, an original movie musical written by Brown and Robertson. Morris credited Robertson with suggesting movie musicals back in 2018 "but I went, 'When would we do that? We present three live shows every summer, we can't possibly add a movie musical.' Then the pandemic hit, and I went, 'How about a movie musical?''

Morris credited Brown and Robertson with walking the theatre folks through the filmmaking process, and one smash premiere screening at the Bass Concert Hall, nine film festivals, and five awards later, the Summer Stock team decided that Scout shouldn't be a one-off. So this year, rather than three live shows, they would do two live shows and another movie. The stage productions - Alice's Wonderland (a newly commissioned work by Johnson) and In the Heights – just wrapped up successful runs at the McCullough, but with How to Musical Theatre the performers will actually get to be in their own audience, seeing the song-and-dance routine in that magical MGM style of long takes and wide angles that put the performance first. That way, Thigpen said, "You get to feel the whole number."

D: Scott Mann. (PG-13, 107 min.)

47 Meters Down, but 2,000 feet up in the air. If that sounds mean to extreme climbing survival thriller Fall, it's actually a compliment. The 2017 aquatic creature feature was a surprisingly elegant thrill ride that took a simple conceit and executed it in a simple, efficient way. Fall jettisons that leanness in favor of some character development that it never really needs, but it's far from a thin-air imitation of the pulpy fave.

That said, there are more than enough shared character and narrative beats to make the two films feel like Mad Libs variations on a very simple setup. In the soggy precursor, a woman gets dragged to the bottom of the ocean by her sister after she gets dumped by her boyfriend. Replace "bottom of the ocean" with "top of an out-of-service TV antenna in the desert," swap out "sister" for "best friend," and the boyfriend is now a dead husband who fell off a cliff. Still, just like Mandy Moore's shark-dodging diver, widowed Becky (Grace Caroline Currey) is trying to prove that she's not afraid of the world by doing something really, really dumb. In this case, getting dragged by outdoorsy influencer Hunter (Virginia Gardner) up a third of a mile of spindly, rusting metal. Of course they get stuck right at the top and, well, swap great whites for vultures, and running out of oxygen for dehydration, and you've got Fall.

It actually even has a few advantages over 47 Meters Down, not least that it doesn't have to hide its leads' faces behind masks or shoot everything submerged in oceanic gloom. There's that big sky wildness in which they are always framed and lost, and being able to see the look of fear every time another bolt falls off the already rickety ladder is a big improvement over peering through bubbles. Plus, if you weren't afraid of heights before, then Fall will give you the fear. Welcome to vertigo hell, mainly due to the work of cinematographer MacGregor. After rapidly ascending past its setup, Fall requires creative ways to make you feel every inch of the tower (pity the poor theatre staff who, inevitably, will deal with some barf eventually), and MacGregor finds new ways to keep you clinging to the edge of your seat. That's essential, because there's a surprising amount of Becky and Hunter just sitting at the top of a very, very, very ... sorry, feeling a bit lightheaded ... very high pole.

⇔ INU-OH

D: Masaaki Yuasa. (PG-13, 98 min., subtitled)

There is an inferno burning in Masaaki Yuasa. That can be the only explanation as to why he has become one of the most important animation directors working today. It can also be the only explanation for the breadth of his imagination, from the wildly charming campfire bop of Lu Over the Wall to the drunken firefly romp The Night Is Short, Walk on Girl, and most recently the epic Netflix apocalyptic series Japan Sinks: 2020. Every project sees a complete reinvention, from adorably cartoonish to freakishly fantastical. But his latest, magical and bloody historical musical drama Inu-Oh, is a rock & roll, stadium show, pyrotechnic extravaganza.

Like Neil Gaiman's punchy update of the Viking Prose Edda or Maria Dahvana Headley's radical reinterpretation of Beowulf, novelist Hideo Furukawa updated the 14th-century grand historical epic Tale of the Heike, recounting the epic struggle for Japan that roiled the nation two centuries earlier. Into this translation into modern Japanese, he added Heike Monogatari: Inu-O no Maki (The Tale of the Heike: Chapter of Inu-O). This new story riffed on the story of a wandering musician, Tomona (voiced here by Moriyama), blinded by a magical sword, and his friendship with the titular Ino-Oh (Avu-chan), a young man whose body has been twisted by a curse into a form scarcely recognizable as human. Yet when he dances, his body reshapes itself. Even more fortunately for him. Tomona can't see the deformities that have exiled Inu-Oh from everyday society. Two dissidents, two rejects. So of course they invent rock & roll.

Yes, you read that right. In Yuasa's version, the past was just as cool as today, and the revolution in Japanese Noh theatre brought about by the real Inu-Ō is attributed to melding of the formal traditions of courtly gagaku performances with the street carnival glitz of sarugaku. Here, Inu-Ō is reinvented as Inu-Oh, a Bowie-esque transgressive performance artist. The change makes sense considering their respective nicknames - the King of the Dogs becomes the alpha of the Diamond Dogs. He and Tomona (based in no small part on Kakuichi, the blind monk who was equally revolutionary in the development of Noh) get their "Beatles on The Ed Sullivan Show" moment with a stadium spectacle reenvisioning of a performance drawn from the Tale of the Heike, a 25-minute musical jaw-dropper that skips between Queen theatrics and Pink Floyd AV experience. Inu-Oh and Tomona are the classic frontman/guitarist pairing - Mick Jagger and Keith Richards, David Lee Roth and Eddie Van Halen, Steven Tyler and Joe Perry, Liam and Noel Gallagher - butting heads and producing perfect rock & roll.

But Yuasa isn't just transposing modern rock sensibilities onto antiquity. Inu-Oh delves into the ways that biwa-playing monks were used to disseminate an orthodox history, as approved by the shogun. Inu-Oh and Tomona's versions threaten the established order, and in their pop culture rebellion there is real dissent. This adds extra tension to the Muromachi era's answer to the Glitter Twins, as the age-old dilemma of selling out to the man or keeping true to the music, man, becomes the driving beat of an increasingly dark and tragic third act.

But Yuasa is also a fearless optimist, and in the closing echoes of *Inu-Oh* there is a clarion call for the simple power of music, for how a great song can resonate through the ages, and how two boys with a tune can always find each other.

LAAL SINGH CHADDHA

D: Advait Chandan. (PG-13, 159 min., subtitled)

It's been nearly 30 years since Forrest Gump was released to overwhelming acclaim. The story of a simple, guileless man stumbling through the tumultuous Cold War history of the United States resonated with audiences for its gentle treatment of these tough times. Some, me included, find it saccharine and flat. However, those opinions are in the minority, and the film has a firm place as an American classic. But what happens when this story is translated to another culture?

In Laal Singh Chaddha, the official Bollywood remake of Gump, Hindi film superstar Aamir Khan (Dangal) takes on the title role as the naive, perhaps even more demonstrably intellectually disabled Laal. The action moved from Alabama in the Fifties to Punjab in the Seventies, over the course of 40 years Laal meanders through significant events in Indian history in a manner that will be very familiar to fans of the original.

Often, when a film is remade, there is great care taken to adapt the material to its new market. Laal Singh Chaddha makes some of those changes, but most of the adjustments are for the worse. Rather than Hanks' straightforward portrayal of a man with a low IQ, probably somewhere on the autism spectrum, Khan plays Laal as a caricature of an intellectually disabled protagonist; imagine Billy Bob Thornton from Sling Blade, but less subtle. It's almost painful to watch, bringing to mind a certain quote from Robert Downey Jr. in Tropic Thunder that I am hesitant to restate here, but you probably know the one about never going full ...

Without a solid and compelling performance from Khan, the rest of the film is never going to work, but he is not helped by an incredibly lazy adaptation and direction from Kulkarni and Chandan. Much of the dialogue is lifted word for word from Eric Roth's script for *Gump*, and Chandan's direction does little more than

mimic dozens of shots from Robert Zemeckis' original. It's more a reenactment than a remake, something like Gus Van Sant's *Psycho*, but *Gump*ier.

On top of that, all references to sex and drugs have been completely removed. Here Gump's girlfriend Jenny is replaced with Rupa, played as an adult by another A-list actor, Kareena Kapoor, but the script eschews the subtextual commentary provided by Jenny's travels through the underground in favor of a simple girlfriend-of-a-gangster tale. Through no fault of Kapoor's, Rupa's arc is almost completely flat, removing one of the most interesting aspects of the original film. Laal Singh Chaddha is Forrest Gump for people who thought the original film was too edgy, and that's not a good place to be.

I have no doubt that Laal Singh Chaddha will be successful. It's a feel-good film featuring two of Bollywood's biggest stars, and based on one of the most beloved films in history, but it is bad. Even Satyajit Pande's stunning cinematography showcasing the vast and diverse landscapes of India isn't enough to save this maudlin mess. Between dismal digital de-aging, a neutered and uninspired adaptation, direction that seems satisfied relying on shots that already exist rather than building something new, and the gobsmacking, borderline offensive portrayal of the lead character by Khan, Laal Singh Chaddha is a big miss.





follow for the most formative years of your life. And while James Ponsoldt (*The Spectacular Now, The End of the Tour*) authors a slightly uneven depiction of childhood, *Summering* still captures the gentle doom of being aware that your life is about change forever.

It is the final week before the end of summer, and a group of girls is about to make the terrifying leap to middle school. Daisy (Lia Barnett), Lola (Sanal Victoria), Dina (Madalen Mills), and Mari (Grace Redfield) have been friends forever, and the hallmarks of their friendship can be found adorning the secret corner of a nearby riverbed they call Terabithia. But when their final pilgrimage uncovers a dead body, the girls decide to launch one last summer adventure. They will learn the identity of this man and bring it upon themselves to share the news with his loved ones personally.

Given the general premise – preteens on the hunt for a dead body as a symbolic coming-ofage ritual – you'd be forgiven for thinking that Summering is a modern-day take on *Stand by Me*. But *Summering* isn't a film about death. It's a film about dying. After the girls find the man's body, each of them eases back into their evening routines. It is here we notice just how different their family environments truly are. Each girl still carries her parents' belief system proudly, and as the film progresses, these different threads begin to pull the group apart. Whether it's spirituality or science, we see tension within the group where before there was only peace.

These foundational beliefs will shape the places you are accepted and the social circles – half chosen, half preordained – that define your formative years. The days of this group are sorely numbered. As the child most versed in tragedy, Daisy knows this, and her hesitant narration about the world around her only serve to underscore their upcoming transition. Ponsoldt can't help but dabble a bit in magical realism – in one key sequence, a tree made of handprints at the local elementary school begins to shed its leaves – but these flourishes only distract. We do not need magical realism to understand the fantasy that this group is creating.

As they search for facts about the body, the girls' adventure takes them across town and back, but the journey itself never adopts the same poignancy as their casual conversations. Each girl seems afraid to voice her concerns about the coming weeks, so they talk around their fears, puffing up their knowledge of crime scenes and séances while avoiding having the only conversation that matters. In the end, we enjoy the journey, even if the story beats are more harvested than heartfelt. The cast makes it true.



Up-and-coming Show Me Pizza is in your internets, streaming your food on Twitch

The questions drip thick like rivulets of extra sauce over the edge of a hot Neapolitan pie.

Why does Austin's Show Me Pizza stream video of the pizzas they cook – live on

Twitch! – for all the world to see? Is this some attempt at distraction, just another tech gambit trying to compensate for mediocre cuisine? And what does local street art phenomenon TVHead have to do with all of it?

Let's take those three questions in order, one at a time.

First, let's sit down inside the cool, quirkily decorated interior of Show Me Pizza on South First and get some answers from the team behind this busy joint.

"We've been open for 16 months now," says Benjamin Demarchelier, co-owner and manager of Show Me. "So we were in the middle of the pandemic, and one of the things that were doing really well were pizza places. Pizzas are takeout-able and deliverable, so even if nobody can actually sit in your restaurant, you can still sell a whole ton of them and do really well. And that's also why we put everything on TV: We wanted to livestream the ovens so that people could at least peer through a window, a video window, and see what was going on. They can do it from their car, through their phone - wherever they are, they can watch their pizza being made."

But doesn't that seem kind of ... gimmicky? Doesn't it detract from the venerable traditions of piemaking and –

Demarchelier shakes his head. "I mean, gosh," he says, surprisingly passionate about this whole video flex, "with everything going bad in the world, it's great to be able to watch food being made. It's not political, it's not religious, it's just food being made – and what comes out at the end is delicious and ends up in someone's mouth."

Well, within reason, anyway: Sometimes sheer geography might get in the way. "The first week we were open," says Demarchelier, "someone was talking to us on Twitch, trying to order pizza. We'd never taken a Twitch order before, and we were like, 'Wait, what's your address?' The guy says, 'I'm in Beirut.' And we were like, 'Ahhhh, yeah, that's not gonna be possible.' And the guy

was like, 'No, I'll send you my credit card number, I just wanna watch the pizza being made.'"

So let's grant this video streaming some legitimacy; people seem very into it, regardless of other factors.

But of course there *are* other factors: the food, right? The biggest damn factor of all. Which, it turns out, is also surprising.

New York native Demarchelier grew up in a hospitality family, the son of successful restaurateurs who had him washing dishes at 12 years old at Sunset Beach in Shelter Island. He's a food service lifer – and a respected one. Demarchelier can cook, too, but he's not the chef here.

Dimitri Voutsinas – another native New Yorker, another co-owner (his wife, Chrissy Argao-Voutsinas, is the third of the Show Me Pizza triumvirate) – is the chef. Voutsinas is why the live-video schtick, as engaging as it may be, is only extra sauce: He used to run the kitchens of New York's renowned Motorino Pizzeria Napoletana.

"I did the whole gamut in New York," says the thickly bearded culinary maestro, "from running a place in Queens to running a place in Times Square, to the Russian Tea Room, Bar Boulud, Red Rooster. And I ran Motorino for quite a few years, fixing the recipes, the recipe books, and managing the three locations in New York. I opened a bunch of restaurants for them in Asia, too. Motorino does the same style of Neapolitan pizza, but ours here is slightly different."

"Motorino's was the first Margherita pizza I ever had," says Demarchelier. "It was amazing, and it was Dimitri's recipe. And he brought that here, adjusted it for the water and the humidity, and we ended up with this really great pizza."

Voutsinas brought it here so he and his wife could open Show Me Pizza with

"When I was asked if I'd [design the box art], I said, 'Lemme go try the pizza.' So I went there anonymously and tried it. And I've been in Austin since '98, and I think it's the best pizza in town right now."

Demarchelier. Argao-Voutsinas' family is in Houston, and the three friends had wearied of the New York food-service grind – and the weather. "In Austin, instead of nine months of winter," says Demarchelier, "we get nine months of nice weather. Three months of hotter-than-hell, too, but if my feet aren't in snowboarding boots, I don't wanna be anywhere near snow – and I'm getting kind of used to the 100-degree temps. Just gotta dip into Barton Springs Pool every once in a while."

Meanwhile, the food. Because one outstanding Margherita pie does not a pizzeria make: You need a variety, and each place has to have its own specialties of the house. So, what's unique to Show Me Pizza?

"The Cashville Hot Chicken," says Demarchelier. "That was Dimitri's idea, inspired by the Nashville hot chicken boom. Burrata's the base, and then fried chicken, and – we had to deconstruct it. Because, in the beginning, we tried the chicken, and –"

"It was basically fried to order," says Voutsinas, "and put on the pizza halfway through? And business was slow enough when we first opened that we could do it. But when business picked up, we were like, "This is fucking impossible.' The way it was put together just threw a wrench in the works. So now we pre-smoke the chickens ourselves, pull it apart, it gets crunchies on top – it just makes a better pizza."

"The 50 First Dates is a traditional Hawaiian pizza," says Demarchelier, "but Dimitri puts onion bechamel on it, and mesquite-smoked pork, fresh-roasted pineapple, chili oil, and thyme."

"The Domo Arrabiatta is a play on a pasta dish I used to do at Motorina, actually," says Voutsinas. "It's the same ingredients, but I turned it into a pizza."

Demarchelier nods, grinning. "With the fermented chiles and the honey, gosh, it's – it's such a delightful pizza."

"We do as much as we can in-house," says Voutsinas. "We ferment the chiles, we smoke the meats, we do the desserts here – panna cotta, tiramisu – and the salads are put together by us, the meatballs are made here. Everything that obviously *isn't* bought somewhere. I mean, I'm not gonna sit here and make mozzarella cheese. I *can*, if I wanted to – but not for the amount that we put out."

"Right now we've got a pizza called Peachy Keen, with Fredericksburg peaches," says Demarchelier. "It's so great that it'd be on the menu year-round, except those peaches are really hard to get in the winter."

"A lot of our weekly specials turned into permanent pizzas on the menu," notes Voutsinas. "The Four Cheese Apocalypse, the Domo Arrabbiata. The Meaty Boi. We haven't really changed the menu for a while, but the first six months we were open, we changed the menu like every two weeks. Now we've got a good mix of something for everybody on our menu – plus a special, plus you can make your own."

So. We've listened, we've sampled, we're sated. The question of culinary quality is answered: Show Me Pizza is, to cop a bilingual palindrome, muy yum.

A peel-that-last-glop-of-mozz-off-the-card-board-and-yearn-for-more-even-though-you're-already-happily-stuffed kind of yum. The crusts alone – "adjusted for the water and the humidity" – could make St. Anthony weep tears of joy.

Now what about this TVHead guy and those bold images stamped by hand onto every pizza box flying from the store? How does Austin's notorious wheat-paste provocateur, whose posters and stickers either glorify (or maybe desecrate) so much local infrastructure, get involved in what amounts to, ultimately, pizzadvertising?

"I was working with Natassia Wilde," the anonymous artist currently known as TVHead tells me from his base of operations at Bender Bar & Grill. "She runs Wilde Art Curation and she's been repping my gallery work. And somehow she knew or crossed paths with Ben at Show Me Pizza, and together they came up with this idea for the box – this is my version of the story – to have a monthly artist and put their work on the box."

(Note: The Pizza Box Art project was initially pitched by Samantha Alcantara of Luxe Art Agency, nomming pies and brainstorming in Show Me Pizza with associates Wilde and Demarchelier.)

"At first I was like, 'Ehhhh,'" says TVHead, shrugging over his beer. "But, see, I'm a designer. Since I was a kid, I've always been into making my own products and, like, ads and stuff. So, later, I took whatever I was doing for clients and started doing it through TVHead – and I'm still doing that. And I'm proud of this project, too – proud to work with Show Me Pizza, and to have Natassia represent me. When I was asked if I'd do this, I said, 'Lemme go try the pizza.' So I went there

anonymously and tried it. And I've been in Austin since '98, and I think it's the best pizza in town right now."

OK, but doesn't it seem like there's a weird disconnect here? That the anticonsumerist TVHead message is – c'mon, now – it's being used to sell a consumable product?

The artist chuckles in the shadows. "Oh, well, yeah, of course – that's the greatest thing ever. That's the joke of the joke. Even though the art's on a pizza box for a business, I'm telling you exactly to consume it. It's satire, as far as I'm concerned. It's almost like that movie, you know, where they had the glasses, and, uh —"

They Live by John Carpenter?

"Yeah, it's like that. But I just make my shit so you don't have to wear the glasses."

Ah, we love that quote. And we have more to report about TVHead and his beyond-pizza doings, but for now, dear reader, we've answered the three questions that incited our foodie quest.

And so, noting that the Pizza Box Art project of hand-stamped originals will continue at Show Me with a new artist every few months – the prolific Savannah Lure's work is up next, debuting at a launch party this Sunday, Aug. 14 – we order ourselves one of those sausagey John Kelso pies and, while tracking its creation on Twitch, type a heartfelt "Bon Appétit!" into the chatscreen's illuminated scroll, our mouth anticipating the Neapolitan pleasure our eyes can already see.



Hot Summer Nights Reviews

Free music fest cools out record hot summer

BILLY GLITTER AT CHESS CLUB

Thursday, 9pm, 94 degrees

Ah, Chess Club, In contrast to the tiny room's dank and damp days as Plush, the venue was literally one of the coolest havens during Thursday's kickoff of Hot Summer Nights. As Billy Glitter (led by William Grover) and his backing quartet leaned into their first cut – an instrumental laden with Sixties psych-jazz grooves similar to the standards of Grover's recently dissolved ensemble, Nolan Potter's Nightmare Band – the A/C was hitting so hard that it was borderline uncomfortable.

That didn't last long. The temperature rose steadily as bodies packed the place in tandem with the music's rising intensity. Intermittent flurries of instantly memorable riffs - evocative of Grover's other current outfit, Magic Rockers of Texas - are BG's M.O., and they permeated 2020 singles "Blind Eye" and "Class Act." hinting at the band's wide-ranging influences. Following tunes still relied on some spectacularly psychedelic organs, but likewise took on Stooges-esque punk ("Texas Tollway Authority"), Black Sabbath-borne heaviness ("Holds No Weight"), Zappa-faithful freakouts ("Tomb Mold"), and ... classic rock?

Yep, the undeniable influence was celebrated fully with a mid-set cover of Don Henley's "Boys of Summer" - a sly nod to this HSN's namesake, and a compass pointing to the crux of Billy Glitter: blending familiar yet sonically diverse earworms.



Thursday, 10pm, 91 degrees

No one will forget the name of the band they saw Thursday at Chess Club, as interactive vocalist Mai Wells offered learning clues. "Look down at your feet: what do you see?" asked the Choux Choux bandleader, later informing the stuffed audience that "chou" is French for cabbage, ahead of post-punky track "DayQuil." With only the one recorded single and live shows launched last year, the convergence of guitarist Emily Kolb (Sun Machine), drummer Gaby Rodriguez (Hey Cowboy!), and bassist Carol Gonzalez (Manifest Destiny's Child) drew enough interest to hit capacity.

Though those peering through the sidewalk windows may have missed the finer points of Wells' generally alienhumanitarian introductions ("This is about being the entire universe in a weird human shell"), the message conveyed via abstract face makeup, pasties, and white leather fringe. Swerves between spoken word, chatty group vocals, and sharp punk sneer smoothed out under the quartet's instrumentals. Disco strums and Western psychedelia-dusted grooves fell in step under a relentless beat, granted extra intrigue by Gonzalez's krautrockleaning basslines

Mid-set, an unexpected cover of chaotic comedy rocker Liam Lynch's 2002 "United States of Whatever" fit the Austin group's surf rock tones and snarky delivery, complete with an exaggerated New York accent. Among the evening's instrumental swapping – including Wells on bass and drummer Rodriguez on guitar - shared triple vocals up front provided the most powerful blast. If all members can fit on the narrow stage, Choux Choux proved a triangle formation hits hard at the corner of Seventh and Red River

Friday, 11:40pm, 85 degrees

Norman Ba\$e carries not giving a fuck to the nth degree. Twenty minutes 'til midnight, in the cleanest designer socks on Red River, he occupies the floor in front of the stage, blazed and talkin' shit.

"This ain't no commercial shit! This ain't no Mama Duke shit," Ba\$e prefaces, presumably referencing the fellow Austin wordsmith being on the cover of the Chronicle. "This is real shit."

Over a grimy bassline, the Harlem-cultivated lyricist drops into "Big Daddy Kane, Vol. 1," riding the hook: "Gitchi-gitchi ya-ya/ Bitch I'm selling powder/ If you got that chicken then come and get your flour." The track lays out Ba\$e's calling cards: slanged-out street themes laced with pop-culture wordplay, including referring to himself as the "Black Elmer Fudd" and threatening to "Leg drop your throat like Hulk Hogan."

Interspersing his live band cuts (drums, bass, and a supplementary MC) with a capellas, Ba\$e's vocal tone and prosody are reminiscent of late genius MF DOOM. Rolling into "ODB," which blew up after being featured on a Thrasher skate video, the closing bar - "Flip more stones than that dog named Dino" - makes the crowd at KUTX personality Fresh Knight's HSN showcase get loud.

Scour YouTube or SoundCloud to find Ba\$e's best tracks, like December's "Heavy D," which he stumbles to start - blaming being blunted - then salvages into the show's peak moment of Black poetics before hitting a hustle-ballad hanging on the line, "I don't want to live no more/ Sometimes I hear death knocking on my front door."

That brings the set – as engaging as it was rough around the edges. yet undeniably likable – to a close. Total duration: 12 minutes. – K.C.

EL COMBO OSCURO AT FLAMINGO CANTINA

Friday, midnight, 84 degrees

Heat? What heat? Eighty-four degrees 'round midnight felt like no weather at all Friday night of HSN, and that El Combo Oscuro both filled Sixth Street sanctuary the Flamingo Cantina then sustained its perpetual motion through an hourlong set demonstrated music's immutable E=mc² formula in real time on a fine ATX summer night: entertainment equals music-coupling squared.

Any arts scene grows in concentric circles - of eras, groupings, genres. Those rings in the capital's south-of-the-border music scene count El Tule toward the center of the local alt-Latin universe. Acts from Northern Mexico rarely penetrate Austin's westside media, but homegrown Hispanic bands making the rounds of local rock clubs increase in numbers quarterly. On one mano, count Grupo Fantasma, Como Las Movies, Money Chicha, Superfónicos, Nemegata.

And, of course, El Tule affiliates El Combo Oscuro.

Frontman for both, John Dell's Spanish pierces high and tart, and in the latter sextet - three pieces percussive (congas, timbales, drums), except keyboards also count in that category, as does the singer when he picks up hand percussion - the cumbias under him sizzle and zap in equal electric current. From the instant that ECO's psych-tinged razzle-dazzle rumbled on, all bodies in the doubledecker dance hall began grooving. Movement attracts women, women attract everyone, and presto, instant ecosystem.

Dell's spidery guitar, Peter Fuller's brick-house bass, Mauro Lopez's lysergic detailing, and Sevylla del Mazzo's conga click track animated instrumentals and chanters indiscriminately, most notably El Tule's "El Sonámbulo." No sleepwalking here.

"Hard, Fast & Unapologetic" — Raul's Shifts Into Fourth Gear

In the wake of the one-night debut of the Skunks and the Violators, Austin punk begins in earnest BY TIM STEGALL

"IT AINT ABOUT PLAYING THE RIGHT CHORDS, FOR A START!"

"I thought punk music, for the most part, was pretty crappy," says Skunks drummer Billy Blackmon in his nicotine-cured drawl. "But I liked the fact that it was simple and it was back to the roots of rock & roll, stuff that kids could play. None of us were great musicians. We weren't Eric Johnson or somebody like that. We weren't on that level, and we had no pretensions of playing like that.

"We were very hard, we were very fast, and we were very unapologetic," he adds. "Because at that time, music was Elton John and Queen. It was very overproduced, and it was very schlocky. Not all of it was bad, but there just wasn't any bare-bones rock & roll that the kids could play."

"It ain't about playing the right chords, for a start!" the Clash's Joe Strummer

snarled in 1979 at an American TV newscaster who had the nerve to ask him what punk was about, as if it were the most obvious thing in the world. In reality, it took at least some modicum of skill in order to play punk rock in a manner that rose above the faceless leather-jacketed hordes. Otherwise, you matched the sneers of "proper" musicians that "those guys can't play." But you didn't want to be too good, lest you alienate your audience.

"Proficiency could work against you, in some ways," muses the Violators' Carla Olson, quite a skilled guitarist in her own right, "Because if you were too proficient, it was considered boring. You really didn't wanna show all your licks, because then you weren't considered hip."

"We were green, too," adds Skunks guitarist Eddie Muñoz. "It actually worked for us, because we had the confidence to overplay and stuff, you know, and we had a great drummer. He filled all the holes and gave the cues and stuff."

"What we knew, we played the hell out of," affirms his bass-thumping bandmate Jesse Sublett.

"Yeah, a year before, you weren't that good," Muñoz grins at his bandmate. "But cranking it out with a really good drummer, you got really good at doing all these runs and stuff. It inspired you, man. That was some inspired shit."

"I had never played with a good drummer before Billy," affirms Sublett.

"He kicked your ass, he kicked my ass," smiles Muñoz. "I mean he could hear me coming. He could tell the kind of accent I was going to play and he would just do it."

"None of us were great musicians," snorts Blackmon. "It was about energy."

Sublett, at least in those days, did not see the Skunks as a punk band. "I saw us as a glo-

rified garage band with ambitions for greatness." he wrote in 2004 memoir Never the Same Again. When Joe Nick Patoski profiled them for the Austin American-Statesmen in September 1978, Sublett sneered, "People who know what we're like, those who've heard us and still think we're punks - that's dumb. We're just a rock & roll band."

But surely a diamond-hard rock & roll band with bags of energy, Nuggets tendencies, a few Stooges covers, and a brace of originals that sound like Lou Reed outtakes is one definition of "punk rock," isn't it? Lo-fi recordings from perhaps the Skunks' second gig show them possessing enough power to fuel several industrial generators. Blackmon bashes ferociously, skillfully, Sublett gets off some nimble basslines, drawling the whole way like some longlost South Texan cousin of Lou Reed. And Muñoz rips like the second coming of the Stooges' James Williamson, letting loose all this crazed, gibbering voltage.

As for their 01/28/78 bill mates, the Violators? "The Violators were very young kids," says Blackmon. "Marilyn was like 16, Kathy was 16, Carla was probably 21. Jesse was probably the best musician in that band, off the top of my head. Carla was good. They were just kids playing fast English punk music. Those were our influences at that time."


"MOMMA, WHATS A PUNK?"

"We did a few of those Skunks/Violators double bills, until we could do it on our own and the Violators could also play their own show," says Muñoz. "The double draw bill really built up an audience for both bands."

The January 28 bill established the punk beachhead at Raul's. It also brought in two different demographics, who weren't always mutually exclusive: 1) future musicians and bandleaders; and 2) Radio-Television-Film majors from the University of Texas, just across the street.

"A whole lot of people started because of us," says Sublett. "I dunno how many times I heard that. It was quite an honor."

"That's when the punk rockers from RTF started coming over," affirms Muñoz. "Then the scene developed even better and it got cooler. Of course, the RTF students want to latch on to anything that's halfway arty, so they latched on to the punk thing. A whole lot of creatives came out of that program. It



was really good obviously, because the technology was so primitive that people were forced to stretch their imaginations."

"Getting the Bodysnatchers involved was really cool, too, because they were a lot of fun," he adds.

Enter Austin's Third Punk Band: the Bodysnatchers, composed of a coterie of musicians from Abilene who'd all migrated to the River City in "68/69/70," according to guitarist Tom McMahon.

"I did all the wild stuff, the soloing and feedback and smashing things," he quips.

McMahon, singer Larry James, "tenor" bassist Kyle Brock (also in the Electromagnets, another group of displaced Abilenians, aside from guitarist Eric Johnson), second bassist(!!) Jimmy Pettit, and brothers Chris Bailey on guitar and Ian on drums played "sharp, hard-edged blues things" from the harder British Invasion outfits like the Yardbirds and the rowdier early UK psychedelia from the Creation, "six to nine months before the Sex Pistols happened." A chance trip by McMahon to the 7-11 at 38th and North Lamar pointed them in the new direction.

"I was looking in the magazine rack, and I saw a magazine that said, 'Punk Rock!" he says. "It had all these guys who looked really bizarre – their hair was sticking out in spikes all over the place, and they were all taped up, their guitars were taped up. They had plastic wrap all around them. It was Richard Hell & the Voidoids on the cover. And I looked through the magazine, and it was a whole new look and attitude. It was fresh, and I like to tear things up!"


He brought the mag to band practice, and the spiky, jagged visuals and outsider attitude held the same appeal. Seeing the Pistols at Randy's Rodeo sealed it: "Let's go back home and do this!" That night, they became the Bodysnatchers, named for director Don Siegel's 1956 B sci-fi classic *Invasion of the Body Snatchers*, which enjoyed a big-budget remake later in the year.

"Larry was a good songwriter, a good lyricist," says McMahon. "He brought in all those songs, like 'Momma, What's a Punk?' [and] 'Are You Into Destruction.' Then we wondered, 'Where will we play?' So we heard Raul's was going to have a couple of other bands that we did not know about. We hadn't heard about the Skunks or the Violators yet."

The Bodysnatchers went on a fact-finding mission during a Raul's happy hour that nearly ended in disaster when bouncer Bobby Morales put McMahon in a headlock to stop them spitting beer at one another. "Oh, I'm sorry! I'm sorry!" the guitarist begged off. "We won't do that again! Hey, can we play here?" Much like the Violators, they got their foot in the door by opening one of fellow Abilenian Billy Maddox's Project Terror's Thursday nights. Songs like "Obsession/Depression" suggested a deep intimacy with the intricacies of Never Mind the Bollocks. Here's the Sex Pistols, down to McMahon and Bailey's chugging Steve Jones guitar work and James' Johnny Rotten-esque snarl and rolled Rs. The Bodysnatchers hit hard the solar plexuses of the growing RTF masses now filling the club. After The Austin Sun's Michael Ventura marveled at their aggro take on Larry Williams' "Bony Moronie" in his piece "Nights at Raul's: 'Hey Mama -What's A Punk," James shrugged, "That's what New Wave's done mostly - people aren't afraid to stand up tall and play three chords. The only thing I got against all this

Austin's "New Wave": The Violators

"What we want is to be short and savage, gettin' to drink a lot of beer, and loud!"

"We belch."

Austin's 1½-month-old "female punk" band, the Violators (a name created by Van Wilkes of the Fools), is moving up fast and hard. They work. Loud, aggressive, nasty rock 'n roll you can dance to—pogo even.

"We don't want to be limited to Ramones and Sex Pistols," says Kathy Valentine, guitarist, about their songs. "We have some originals, and our friends write us songs. We don't deny our roots—Rolling Stones and all that." "Let's Spend the Night Together," "Top o' the Pops" (Kinks), "Stroll-On" (Yardbirds)...they'll do it if it works.

"Punk" and "female" do not accurately describe the band. What are they? Not tired. Jesse Sublett, bass player, explains: "You can be interesting without being commercially, technically adept. Be short and sweet, fast, without that much bullshit...sometimes a lead break—that's it. We work harder when we play than most musicians. Playin' Fleetwood Mac wouldn't even break ya into a sweat."

"It's a shame the punk media doesn't

refer to the music at all," says Carla Olson, the group's oldest member. "It's not social statements; it's a musical statement. It's not 'I think things are fucked up—get out there and ung, ung, jump, jump, jump..' It's for its own sake. I just wanna make noise, play guitar!" About sex roles she adds, "I'd like to have a scrotum strapped under the guitar. You don't even think about being male or female up on stage playing music.

"We'll play for free, we'll play before some shitty band—as long as we're playin'—because it gets us off more'n anything else we could be doing, even sex. We'll play anywhere people want to get down and have a good time. We have the contacts to record—just don't have enough together yet. We just want to give the people sittin' home waitin' something to go out to."

Says Marilyn Dean, their teenage drummer, "It's the only thing in this fuckin' society that I can put in me ... Fuck money, tuck everybody, fuck it, fuck it!"

shit is that there are too many new guys who aren't proficient."

The lack of chops must've bugged James and some of the other Bodysnatchers something fierce. Before summer was through, they were no more. Brock returned to the Electromagnets, playing with their guitar hero Eric Johnson for nearly 30 years. Other Bodysnatchers went on to other punk or New Wave projects, as Larry James indulged a love of funk and soul music in Daddy Longlegs, among other such outfits. One night at Raul's, he even pulled double duty, fronting both bands in a bill dubbed "Punk vs. Funk."

"I WANT SOME DAMAGE! I HATE AUSTIN!"

Feb. 17, 1978, the Ramones invaded Cosmic Cowboy stronghold Armadillo World Headquarters, accompanied by teenage all-female Los Angeles quintet the Runaways. Led by black leather chainsaw rocker Joan Jett, their punk/glam/hardrock mixture was catalytic to the scene building in the Masque, the Hollywood club that visionary Scottish immigrant Brendan Mullen opened in the trashed-out basement beneath the Pussycat porn theatre. Several more punks attended than the 60-100 RTF majors and curiosity seekers at Raul's 21 days before, including stilllong-haired skateboarder Chris Gates and a 6-foot-5-inch UT art major from Ft. Worth named Steve Marsh, who arrived wearing an Army surplus gas mask. Gary Floyd, newly returned from his San Franciscan residency where he'd witnessed the Pistols' self-immolation at Winterland, stood out with a peroxide spike-top haircut that was the first Sublett had seen within city limits. A viable punk scene was obviously building in Austin, one requiring a dedicated venue. Raul's filled the breach with weekly punk nights, advertised in UT's student-run newspaper The Daily Texan. Two months later, the Skunks and the Bodysnatchers began a Monday night residency, alternating the headlining slot each week.

With Raul's club manager Joseph Gonzales now needing to fill a calendar, some acts of a dubious lineage began taking the stage.

"There were a lot of bands that would play like one or two gigs," laughs the Delinquents' Brian S. Curley. "They looked like rich kids from the suburbs who had maybe seen a picture of CBGB or something. They were dressing like they thought they were supposed to dress. There were lots of stripes and polka dots." And probably plenty of pairs of wraparound sunglasses, in accompaniment.

Anyone attempting to take the Raul's stage confronted a tough, critical audience. Ventura captured the damage all and sundry faced in his Austin Sun report: A drunk "Chicano kid" screams at no one in particular, "I want some damage! I want some damage! I HATE AUSTIN! I HATE AUSTIN!" A tableful of twerps spitting beer at Muñoz back down as he unplugs his Strat, jumps offstage, and strides over, advising them to "live their pose or stuff it. They stuffed it." Another couple makes a great show of smashing every bottle of beer they order against the wall after one swig. The woman yells, "Fuck 'em in the ass if they can't take a joke!" The Vamps from San Antonio, having faced down the cowbovs at Randy's Rodeo warming up for the Pistols, tried their luck at Raul's at least twice. Singer Frank Pugliese recalls their long hair not going over well. Makes you wonder if the Ramones' Prince Valiant shags would've netted the same treatment, had they walked in.

"WE BARELY ESCAPED CERTAIN DEATH ..."

Meanwhile, Austin's First and Second Punk Bands' gig schedules began filling up. As both the Violators and the Skunks grew in strength and confidence, and as more local punk bands began forming, they didn't necessarily need to be co-billed. Though as they began venturing outside the city limits to spread the virus around the state, they tended to be a package. At Binary Star in Dallas that February, some wag in the audience yelled at Muñoz: "Jimi Hendrix!"

"Eddie incited a loud wave of hostility when he replied, 'He's DEAD, man!'" chuckles Sublett.

"Oh, man! The Violators!" exclaims guitarist Barry "Kooda" Huebner of Dallas' Nervebreakers, who opened for the Pistols at the Longhorn Ballroom two days after Randy's Rodeo. "I remember I traded pins with Kathy that night, and the Violators pin was just 'The Violators' written in ballpoint pen on a piece of paper, taped over some other band's badge! I still have it!"

A March 3 "Violaters" date with Texas hard rockers Nitzinger at a New Braunfels dive called the El Conquistador Ballroom was no less friendly. And their roadie "Fazz" Eddie Muñoz (as he was billed in those days) hardly soothed the growling headbangers.

"He came up at the end of the set to sing 'Search and Destroy,' maybe another Iggy tune," Sublett recalls. "And as if things weren't sufficiently hostile, he egged them on. Reminds me of that Churchill line about nothing being quite as exhilarating as being shot at – and missed."

"The predominantly female group absorbed like a sponge the hostility and used it as fuel for their high energy punk rock performance,"

a local music rag noted, in prose drier than the Mojave Desert, beneath the shock/horror headline "Violators Attacked."

"We barely escaped certain death or at least sore buttholes from that shit-for-brains crowd," smirks Muñoz. "Of course, I had nothing to do with stirring the pot. No, sir."

"Dallas wasn't a big punk city. Not like Austin," muses Olson. "They had a couple of bands, but Austin grew like wildfire. Everybody suddenly had to get their amps fixed up and get some guitars and learn how to play. You had your three chords and your minor, and you were off!"

Local press started picking both bands' brains, looking at the burgeoning Raul's scene as a source of sexy copy. Some of the earliest was an *Austin Sun* Violators item featuring Olson scoffing that she'd "like to have a scrotum strapped under the guitar," as Sublett snarled, "We work harder when we play than most musicians. Playin' Fleetwood Mac wouldn't even break ya into a sweat!" The photo accompanying the piece, snapped at the ruins of the original Mother Earth location, was a harbinger of what was to come.

"When Jesse showed up to our photo session wearing a Skunks T-shirt, I said, 'Uhuh. This isn't working,'" says Valentine. "So we said mutually he should do the Skunks. We'll get somebody that's devoted to us, that'll wear our T-shirt."

Sublett writes in *Never the Same Again* of how his new girlfriend Lois Richwine, newly moved from San Antonio into a shared apartment with the female ¾ of the Violators, encouraged him to concentrate on the Skunks: "You're better musicians, and you write great songs."

"The Violators were fun, but ... I needed a band that could become an extension of me," he writes. And that was the Skunks. It was settled – he was now a full-time Skunk.

"We got a guy named Byron Davies," smiles Valentine. "He went by Buck. He was seeing one of Lois' friends. He looked like he was in the Ramones, with not as good hair. He had a really beat-up motorcycle jacket that he'd obviously been wearing a long time, and high-tops and jeans. He fit just fine."

And as more bands formed in the Violators', Skunks', and Bodysnatchers' wake, a few gazed upon the current Austin Holy Punk Trinity with a certain schadenfreude.

"Bodysnatchers were already a band with a different name," dismisses early Austin punk's greatest frontman, Ty Gavin of the Next. "The Violators, they were doing covers. The Skunks were also doing covers, and they were both kinda New Wave, to us. That's just from our point of view.

"But that's not what matters," he chuckles. "What matters is what the outside world sees."

OTIS WILKINS CALLS TO "EAT YER PHONE"

With the guitar-driven catharsis of his band Otis the Destroyer largely sidelined during the pandemic, Taylor Wilkins began exploring new sounds on a string of solo singles under the moniker Otis Wilkins. His latest, "Eat Yer Phone," dishes a dreamy, soulful pop ode to summer - and a timely reminder to get off your phone, love vourself, and have some fun.

"I go through all sorts of phases with my music and I'm sure that's not unique, but I get really obsessed with things," Wilkins acknowledges. "At one point in the

pandemic I was riding my bike around town and listening to Madonna's first record on repeat. There's a shimmering synth at the very beginning of 'Lucky Star' that I really wanted to reproduce, and Max Lorenzen nailed it while mixing and engineering the song.

"It's sort of like an Otis Wilkins mixtape that references some of my favorite flavors," he adds of an EP anticipated later this year.

Wilkins recorded the song at Good Danny's studio in Lockhart with Taylor Turner on bass and Aric Garcia contributing percussion, but Andrew Bennet's freshly released video truly captures the delicious glow of Austin's late-summer slacker vibe. Wilkins plays his best Lebowski as he croons into the desperation of getting into Instagram shape, only to be reminded that what really matters happens with friends IRL.



FUCK MONEY IN THE TUNNELS

Many aspire to attend a punk show in the sweaty, hallowed drainage tunnels of Austin, but too many accidentally miss the last-minute Instagram announcements, or perhaps fear venturing into the unknown via walking trails after dark. For an artful, mud-free look at the mayhem, Fuck Money offers "TUNNEL SHOW {Official Film - 2022}." The self-directed short - with director of photography Isaac French builds atmospheric transitions into a set by the caustic punk act from February 12, with Volante Beach and Blank Hellscape. A combination of close-ups on vocalist Taszlin Muerte in an orange spacesuit and grainy from-above cuts compellingly captures the wintertime mosh and emotion. - Rachel Rascoe

FINALLY ON VINYL: KATHY MCCA-RTY'S CLASSIC DANIEL JOHNSTON

Dead Dog's Eyeball, Kathy McCarty's 1994 reimagining of Daniel Johnston songs, is a testament to the pure love found in friendship and music. By transforming the low-fidelity, outsider-style original tracks to soulful ballads with clean, high-quality production by Brian Beattie, the ex-Glass Eye members and close friends of Johnston brought a more complete realization to the original vision behind the songs. This collaborative effort to make the childlike, proto-alternative expressions more stylistically accessible to a wider public demonstrated McCarty's desire to ensure the unique work of the once underground Johnston "would not perish unheard by the larger world." Now in a 2LP gatefold. - Mars Salazar

LORD & SHARP IN THE GLOW OF BETULA BIRCH

Fans only awake to Michael C. Sharp's heavier leanings - setting a reckless tempo for Impalers or having clamorously contributed to Uniform's compressed, industrialized noise swirl - might get a soothing shock out of Betula Birch Embers. The collaboration with Neil Lord, meditational nucleus of prolific conceptual vibe-ists Future Museums, is an hour of nothing but wide-open spaces - ideal as a soundtrack for some rustic, outdoor massage parlor. Both musicians are credited with guitars, but it's easier to believe all instruments were played by the wind. Above trickling pools of Rhodes piano, their strings rustle with ominous intent, like hanging metal chimes catching gentle drafts from a storm brewing imperceptibly in the distance. - Julian Towers

CASH GRAB HAS A "HEART ATTACK"

For all the impatience implied by fledging Austin rock trio Cash Grab's moniker, their painstaking process has produced a potent payoff. Debut single "Heart Attack" - recorded by Rich Bauer (drummer for Paul Val) at 512 Studios - was banked for months before arriving August 5 as a superbly polished piece: structurally simple, compellingly powerful, and instantly memorable. The three-minute cut is propelled by a 12-bar base with punk ethos, soaring vocals (occasionally amped by grungy grit à la Dave Grohl), and screaming blues-rock riffs. One listen to this anti-altruistic anthem and you'll be belting it word for word. - David Brendan Hall

JAKE LLOYD WORKS UP A "SWEAT"

Stuntin' with an axe in brown duck bib overalls. Jake Lloyd has a new look; blue-collar seduction. There's a whole wheelbarrow full of yardwork antics in the new video from Austin's smooth singer/ rapper/instrumentalist flexing alongside his rake-playing producer and leaf-blowing bassist. The second single since last year's next-level Geto Gala collab with Deezie Brown lays down a full-torque funk groove, building into a summertime anthem that serves as both a reassuring love song and a reminder not to work too hard. - Kevin Curtin

DANTE'S HIFI COMES TO AUSTIN

Soho House, Tuesday-Saturday weekly at 6pm. Members only.

Soho House brings a lively interpretation of the jazu kissa from Japan via a vearlong pop-up installation of the Miami-based Dante's HiFi - an audiophiliac, vinyl-only listening bar. Similar to the brick-and-mortar parent in the Magic City's Wynwood District, the South Congress club outfitted its prescreening room with custom equipment from Sound Luxe Audio in Miami. including vintage Klipschorn speakers with custom crossovers and a Sixties McIntosh tube amplifier. With Mohawk and Breakaway Records teaming to open another high-fidelity listening room in nearby Hotel Magdalena's basement. Soho looks to take its part in ushering in a



communal experience for members and guests with high-end, analog audio experiences.

"Music has been a welcome centering piece to cultural resonance in Austin." says Darren Griffin, who oversees membership and events for the local chapter. "Bringing Dante's HiFi helps reinforce that notion and allows Soho House to contribute to the city's musical roots."

Music in Miami's location and the Austin pop-up is rooted in noted DJ Rich Medina's personal collection. The world-renowned tastemaker says the pop-up won't only be for the famous, such as recent opening dates by Stretch Armstrong and Jarobi (of A Tribe Called Quest). "We put a great deal of emphasis on the local digging community, the local vinyl DJ community, from people who have the star power to rookies that just got started," explains the Cornell graduate and former college basketball player, using hoop analogies. "We consider ourselves a gym for anybody aspiring to get shots up." - Kahron Spearman

THE VANDOLIERS

3ten ACL Live. Thursday 11

"For the last 10 years I've played punk for country fans, now I get to play country for punk fans," lead singer Joshua Fleming informed a sold-out crowd at Stubb's last March when the Vandoliers opened for Flogging Molly. The DFW outfit, whose self-titled fourth LP hits Friday, comes fully armed with a talent for storytelling and a range of emotion. These boys can take you on a trip through the ring of fire on the way to a Marshall Tucker concert and then drop you off, wasted, at Molly Malone's. - Garv Lindsev

MATT PIKE VS. THE AUTOMATON

Lost Well, Friday 12 & Saturday 13

Set lists document Oakland huffers High on Fire crisping zero stages between Dec. 9, 2019, and June 18, 2021. Said gap year and a half ceased the afternoon after that latter date at Del Valle's Motocross Park, where metal pyrotechnics from Matt Pike's triumvirate qualified as a pandemically induced live music relief moment. The Ballroom, Thursday 18


