VOTER CHECKLIST

Here is everything you need to know before you go to vote. Complete all of the steps below, and you'll be ready and prepared to go to the polls.

- ☐ Confirm voter registration: Registered voters will have received a voter registration certificate (see page 62 for an example). While this document is not needed to vote, it contains helpful information about your districts, precinct, and more. If you do bring it to the polls, a poll worker can use it to confirm your eligibility if there's any problem. Receiving the certificate is confirmation that you are eligible to vote. If you aren't sure you are registered, you can check online at VoteTravis.com or apps.Wilco.org /elections/. Students, see page 2 for more information. As of this printing, the deadline for new registrations for this election will have passed, but please register now for future elections.
- ☐ Update your voter registration name or address: To vote, you must update your registration every time you move or change your name. If you have not updated your voter registration information, you may be required to vote provisionally. That means your vote will not be tallied until the issue surrounding voter information has been resolved. Be sure to update your voter registration BE-FORE YOU COME TO THE POLLS:
- > You may correct your voter registration information on the back of the voter registration certificate and mail it to your local voter registrar.

☐ Vote Early or on Election Day

WHERE: Residents of Travis and Williamson Counties can vote at ANY polling place in their county. Locations and wait times are available at the following county voter information websites.

WHEN: Early voting is available October 24-November 4; times and locations may vary. On Election Day (November 8), polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

☐ Bring Photo ID—You must use one of seven forms of ID to vote:

- > Texas driver license
- > Texas Election Identification Certificate (EIC)
- > Texas identification card issued by DPS
- > Texas handgun license issued by DPS
- > US military identification card with visible photograph
- ➤ US citizenship certificate with visible photograph
- ➤ US passport (book or card)

If you do not have one of the above photo IDs, as a registered voter you can still vote. You will be required to sign a Reasonable Impediment Declaration form and present one of the following documents:

- ➤ Texas voter registration certificate
- Certified birth certificate
- Current utility bill
- ➤ Bank statement
- Government check
- > Pavcheck
- > Any other government document such as an out-of-state driver license or an expired Texas driver license
- ☐ Check ID expiration date: You can still vote with an expired photo ID. IDs may be expired **up to four years**. For voters age 70 or older, there is **NO** limit on ID expiration.

☐ Know your voting rights

- ➤ If you are still in line at 7:00 p.m., stay in line. You will be able to vote past 7:00 p.m. as long as you stay in line.
- You may ask for another ballot if you need to make changes to your ballot after printing it.

- If voting machines are down, you may ask for a paper ballot.
- ➤ If you run into issues on Election Day, call an Election Protection Hotline.

- ☐ Vote safely: The League of Women Voters encourages you to "Be a Safe Texas Voter!"
- > Vote at home by mail: You must be 65 years or older, have a disability, be out of the county during early voting and Election Day, or be an eligible voter in jail. See below for more information on how to apply.
- ➤ Vote early: The early voting period is October 24— November 4. Take advantage of this to avoid busy polling places on Election Day. During early voting and especially on Election Day, vote during non-peak hours, such as mid-morning or mid-afternoon.
- ➤ **Vote with a mask:** That includes polling places anytime you go to vote. We encourage everyone to wear a mask at polling locations so everyone can vote safely.
- ➤ Vote six feet apart: Distance yourself from other voters and poll workers by at least six feet. It may seem that the lines are a bit longer, but that only means everyone is working to stay safe.

HOW TO VOTE BY MAIL

Any registered voter may vote by mail (VBM) if they:

- ➤ are 65 years of age or older (eligible for mail-in ballots for an entire calendar year).
- are sick or disabled (eligible for mail-in ballots for an entire calendar year).
- will be absent from the county during the entire early voting period and Election Day, AND provide an out-ofcounty address where the ballot can be mailed, AND include dates they can receive mail at the out-of-county address (eligible only for one election at a time). Voters who are absent from the county because they are active duty military or because they reside overseas should complete a Federal Post Card Application. Information and forms are available from county and state offices.
- ➤ are confined in jail, but otherwise eligible to vote (eligible only for one election at a time).
- ➤ are expecting to give birth within three weeks before or after Election Day.

The procedure:

- Request the application, which is available for download from the county elections or secretary of state websites, or by calling or emailing the appropriate office. The application is known as an ABBM (application for a ballot by mail). https://bit.ly/2YL0Gi3
- 2. IMPORTANT—The application MUST be completed and received by the early voting clerk in the Travis or Williamson County Elections Division office by October 28, 2022. NOTE: If you submit an ABBM by fax or email, it must also be submitted by mail and received in the appropriate office within four business days of your electronic submission.
- 3. Once received, the mail-in ballot MUST be completed and received by the appropriate early voting clerk no later than Election Day, November 8, 2022, or postmarked on November 8 and received by November 9.

NEW VBM tracker and "Cure" process available at **VoteTexas.gov**.

- ➤ Track your VBM application and VBM ballot throughout the election process.
- ➤ Provide contact information on your VBM application so the county may contact you if you need to fix an error with your application or ballot.

STUDENT VOTERS

Students may use either their parents' address or their college address for voter registration, whichever they consider to be their permanent address. Students cannot be registered in both places. Those who will be away from their permanent address on Election Day and during early voting may request a ballot by mail from their county clerk's office. Student voters should also know that college or university student photo IDs are not accepted at the polls. Be aware of the general ID requirements.

VOTING SYSTEM

Both Travis and Williamson Counties are now using an ExpressVote Ballot Marking Device (BMD), which uses touch-screen technology but produces a paper ballot for tabulation. It is modern, secure, and allows you to verify your selections before casting your vote.



Answers from candidates who didn't respond by the print deadline may be available online.

HOW THE LEAGUE GATHERS CANDIDATE INFORMATION

To compile the *Voters Guide* information, the League of Women Voters Austin Area sends questions to all candidates in major contested races. League members verify accurate contact information provided by various election entities and the Texas Secretary of State. The League formulates all questions through a rigorous questions committee. Candidate replies are printed without editing or verification of content. Due to space restrictions, candidates are given strict character limits. The form into which they enter answers prohibits them from violating the limit. If a response has been cut off due to this constraint, the response has [.] inserted at the end. Candidates are also asked to avoid negative references to their opponents. We reserve the right to redact portions of responses that do not meet our guidelines. Those appearing without a photo failed to submit one. Candidates must submit answers by the deadline provided in order to be included in the printed version. Answers on **VOTE411.org** may be updated after the print deadline.

HOW DOES THE LEAGUE HANDLE BALLOT MEASURES?

For each ballot measure (such as bonds, charter amendments, or other propositions), the League researches and analyzes the topic and provides information to help explain the background and effects of the proposed change. We do not always include pros and cons, and instead focus on explaining potential effects of the measure's passing. If we do offer pros and cons, we make sure they are balanced and include both points of view. The following information is typically included:

- Background: How did this get on the ballot and what group brought it forward?
- > Ballot language explainer: What does the ballot language
- ➤ Potential effects: What possible effects will this ballot measure have on our area?

Background: Experience. We have office infrastructure in place and staff with decades of experience handling constituent casework and legislative issues. Our team will have served two full Congresses op-

erating during natural disasters, foreign conflicts and a pandemic. I currently serve in leadership positions in the Judiciary Committee, Republican Study Committee, and House Freedom Caucus. Former Chief of Staff to Senator Cruz, First Assistant Attorney General of Texas, and Senior Advisor to Governor Perry. Private Sector Experience includes Oil and Gas Attorney and Investment Banking Analyst. Election Laws: Congress has a very narrow role in elections according to the Constitution, however I have introduced legislation to ensure only U.S. Citizens are voting in our elections by providing states with information to secure their election registration rolls.

Immigration: First, secure the border. Enforce all laws being ignored by current Administration. Build border infrastructure, bolster interior enforcement, zero migrant releases absent full detention for adjudication, and designate cartels Foreign Terrorist Organizations and target their assets. Our legal immigration system should welcome those willing to work hard and embrace the rule of law. Immigration reforms that are necessary should only take place after regaining operational control of the border.

Healthcare: I have introduced the Personalized Care Act, which would expand Healthcare Savings Accounts to millions, increase contribution limits, expand allowable expenses, and allow employer contributions. We need to reform the insurance driven system that drive up costs, increases bureaucracy, and restricts freedom.

Priorities: 1. Secure the Border and Our Communities 2. Limit Spending and work towards Balanced Budget 3. Abundant, Affordable Energy Policies – build infrastructure and support domestic production of energy, overturn federal regulations limiting nuclear expansion[.]

Claudia Andreana Zapata (D)

Background: I am an active non-profit volunteer and community organizer, former Texas legislative aide with a history of policy development, and I am an experienced workforce and budget analyst for

the Texas Health and Human Services Commission. I have dedicated hundreds of hours to our community by advancing democracy and volunteering on federal, state, and local campaigns to hosting PPE and vaccine drives for our most vulnerable to protesting human right's violations across the State—I always show up.

Election Laws: We must address issues within our voting practices and mediums while protecting and encouraging civic engagement. Democracy is under attack, and we need to implement federal uniform voting laws that currently exist in the For the People Act and the John Lewis Voting Rights Act. These Acts restore crucial protections against racial voter discrimination, create automatic and same-day voter registration, restore the full protections of the Voting Rights Act, combat voter suppression and gerrymandering. We must also overturn Citizen's United. Additionally, I champion unique policies such as post-office voter centers and public library cards qualifying as voter identification. Immigration: We need a complete overhaul of the inhumane immigration system to mitigate the humanitarian crisis that has been exacerbated by the COVID-19 and climate crisis. I recommend we begin by rescinding Title 42, ending family separation, ending for-profit detention center contracts, upholding domestic and international asylum laws, providing funding to expedite asylum cases, creating an independent oversight commission of the U.S. Customs and Border Protection agency, and expanding protections for temporary and unauthorized workers. We must develop a roadmap to citizenship that is welcoming and does not inundate future citizens with prohibitive costs, fees, and penalties.

Healthcare: I support universal healthcare as access to healthcare should not be reliant upon insurance. In addition, rural counties also face a lack of access to healthcare facilities. I will establish a Care for America program that works with Veterans of Foreign War posts, American Legion posts, and other established community centers to provide routine and preventative care. The program will work similarly to Teach for America with medical students rotated into rural counties—providing more opportunities for healthcare jobs in rural communities allowing students in rural areas increased homegrown job opportunities.

Priorities: I would prioritize expanding food accessibility, ensuring that people have access to healthy food and grocery stores. No one should have to spend up to 3 hours commuting to their closest grocery store. I would prioritize environmental regulation to protect the beauty of Texas hill country and make sure folks have clean, drinkable water and

Rainy Day Fund: Government Finance Officers Association recommends a minimum of 2 months of regular revenue or regular expenditures be maintained in a rainy day fund. Typically, rainy day mon-

ies mitigate the risk of unstable revenues or unexpected expenditures. Natural disasters fall into the 2nd category & Texas ranks 1st in these. The state of Texas' general obligation debt currently is rated Aaa/AAA/ AAA/AAA.

Taxes: Find new revenue for Charter & 313. Texas Legislature added \$6.5 billion dollars in funding to public schools in 2019. Yet per a 2021 SPLC report, Texas currently ranks 40th in the nation. New rev streams are needed. Legalizing adult-use cannabis could bring \$1 billion in tax revenue (and decriminalization could save \$300 million). Look at "green" taxes to build revenue streams from green energy.

Financial Obligations: Re infrastructure, accept & leverage federal dollars. With fuel efficient vehicles, look at creating a revenue from alternative fuels to maintain roads. Public school benefits: employees in all but ~18 school districts do not participate in social security and they should. Public school employees should have excellent healthcare w/o sharing premium costs. Reduce public school property tax reliance Priorities: Statute defines Comptroller as state's 'sole' accountant. We've never had a CPA as our Comptroller. I will be the watchdog over tax dollars, answerable to Texans not special interests. As a hurricane survivor, climate-disasters are personal to me and I will work to mitigate the root cause as well as our risk exposure through SECO. During Winter Storm Uri, wind generated less than 6% of our electricity despite averaging 23% during 2020. Natural gas generated 67% of our electricity dur-

ing the storm despite averaging only 46% in 2020. The RRC has designated natural gas facilities as critical during energy emergencies and put in place weatherization requirements to ensure even better performance in future.

Emissions: Oil and gas production and a clean environment are not mutually exclusive; the six-major pollutants regulated by the EPA have decreased by 77% over the last 50 years. The current Administration's methane rule and natural gas tax could shut down oil and gas production in Texas which would kill jobs, harm our economy, increase costs to consumers, and reduce the reliability of our grid. Seismic Activity: The RRC has in place some of the most stringent rules on disposal wells — the type of wells some link to earthquakes — in the country. In fact, Obama's EPA stated in a report that the Railroad Commission is "commended for establishing new regulations specific to seismicity, including solidifying RRC authority to take appropriate action related to injection well operations."

Ethics: I have never allowed a political contribution to influence my decisions in elected office. I have followed all Texas Ethics Commission rules regarding when I can accept contributions and have in full transparency reported every contribution I have received. I have never received an ethics complaint or violation as Railroad Commissioner.

Strengthening our energy infrastructure is my number one priority because it is unconscionable that Texans have to live in fear that their power will go out the next

time it gets cold. I will establish a clear, substantive, and enforceable weatherization standard, identify critical gas producers, and ensure preparations for the next major storm are actually completed.

Emissions: Methane emissions play a large role in climate change, and the Railroad Commission has a tremendous capacity to address climate change by reducing methane emissions while strengthening the Texas economy. I will accomplish this by enforcing existing regulations, limiting the number of flaring exemptions the Commission grants, identifying and plugging methane leaks, and capping orphaned wells.

Seismic Activity: The Railroad Commission's lackluster approach is responsible for the recent increase in seismicity in West Texas. And now, their response to what is happening is unscientific and out-of-touch with the realities on the ground. The Commission should work with affected communities and experts in the water disposal industry to develop a science-based response to the increase in seismic activity. **Ethics:** My only priority will be to serve the people of Texas. This job is too important, and the stakes are too high to be influenced by the oil and gas executives we're supposed to be regulating. Last winter's storm is a prime example, where over 700 people lost their lives because the Commission failed to hold the gas producers that fund their campaigns accountable.

The RRC has taken good steps to fix issues concerning critical infrastructures designations with ERCOT and weatherization requirements. However, there continues

to be issues with data management, transparency, and with outlining how they will deal with repeat non-compliance. Regarding repeat weatherization non-compliance, I think the RRC should consider waiving the maximum fine of \$1 million.

Emissions: Reducing methane is the most effective strategy for dealing with climate change. Imposing restriction on flaring will reduce methane in TX, but will increase overall methane emission. Flaring/barrel in TX is amongst the lowest in the world. Flaring restrictions will cause forced closure of wells and increases in foreign (less-green) extraction. Solution: Bitcoin mining pays operators to not flare **Seismic Activity:** There's no one-size-fits-all-solution since seismic activity resulting from water disposal varies greatly due to local geologic formations. However, the RRC must recognize that local entities have a disproportionate share of the risks and limited \$ benefit. I would favor moving authority downwards to allow local officials, who are more responsive to local voters, to determine the risk/trade-offs.

Ethics: I pledge that I will only serve one term. Once elected

on November 8th, I will stop fundraising. Also, if it ever comes up that as Commissioner I need to vote on an issue that pertains to some donor or associate, then I will recuse myself from that vote.



Ethics: The only tool we currently have that permits voters to assess the impact of campaign donations on elected judges is campaign finance reports that reveal the sources of campaign donations of each in-

dividual judge. For voters to be completely assured that campaign donations would not impact judicial decision-making, reform of our system of electing judges and financing campaigns is needed.

Standards: On its face, this new rule limits the pool of candidates to a smaller category of lawyers. Most significantly, the rule excludes younger candidates from being elected to this office. This rule has the positive impact of reinforcing

the benefits that come with longer legal experience, but the negative impact of not allowing voters to weigh this benefit against other qualities they may prefer.

Equity: We can improve access to justice for all, including underserved people, by increased public funding for counsel for low-income individuals, improved access to online filing and education on how to use it, and the expansion of selfhelp centers to assist pro se litigants.

Court System: The Texas Courts of Appeals provide litigants the ability to challenge previous legal determinations in their cases, ensuring that the proceedings were fair and that the relevant law was applied correctly. The goal of equal justice under law would be furthered by efforts, some of which are already ongoing, to expand access to courts of appeals to the underserved.



Such an investment would result in a reduction of uninsured spending and of long-term health care costs and in an increase in tax collection.





Donna Howard (D)

Qualifications: Elected in 2006, Representative Donna Howard is a member of the House Appropriations and State Affairs Committees. A native Austinite, she is a nurse and former board

member of Eanes ISD.

Elections: Rep. Howard has championed common sense legislation to expand voting rights. She supports automatically sending high school seniors voter registration applications and voting by mail. Representative Howard opposed discriminatory voting legislation that unjustly impacts people of color, seniors, and people with disabilities. She and her colleagues blocked the bill twice by denying quorum.

Health Services: Representative Howard serves as Chairwoman of the Texas Women's Health Caucus. She was responsible for leading the charge against anti-abortion bills. Representative Howard has testified before Congress and has submitted an amicus brief to the United States Supreme Court on behalf of the caucus. She is a fierce advocate of expanding access to women's health services.

Gun Safety: Representative Howard draws on her background in nursing to find common sense solutions to curb gun violence. She led the effort in securing \$1.5 million for the Safe Storage campaign, which provides education on properly storing firearms to prevent firearm thefts and accidents.

Funding Priority: The Texas Comptroller is estimating a \$27 billion surplus and an overflowing Economic Stabilization Fund. It's crucial that these funds are used to shore up our infrastructure and workforce to ensure the state can best serve its people. The state must modernize its archaic IT infrastructure, invest in our public schools and healthcare workforce, and support retired teachers and public

Qualifications: I worked as an engineer in the energy field and law clerk with a B.S. in Engineering from The University of Texas at Austin, J.D. from SMU, and M.S. from Texas A&M while listen-

ing to constituents.

Elections: I would prevent unmonitored drop boxes and unsolicited ballots while having pole locations within walking distance to voters with hours of operation that allow for more voter access. People who cannot drive or walk to the poles should have access to rides to the poles.

Health Services: The pre-born have reproductive rights as well as the mother with an exception for the life of the mother that should be further clarified in the Texas Legislature to protect the mother and her physician. To address healthcare services, the Texas Legislature can make healthcare services available for the pre-born and the mother to ensure their long term success.

Gun Safety: The right to bear arms thwarts tyrants who are responsible for most murders and gun violence in their communities. For example Mao killed more than 70 million of his own citizens in my life-time and is a prime example of how the right to bear arms can work as the ultimate deterrent to gun violence. Exceptions using court orders already exist to remove guns from people who threaten the innocent.

Funding Priority: The highest legislative priority should be the significant reduction of property taxes that can be accomplished by depreciating the appraisal district value of homesteads by 2% per year from the initial value and frozen land values at the time of purchase. Funding Priority: As Vice Chair of the Human Services Committee in the TX House, I know Texas has underinvested in the safety net for our most vulnerable. Also, teachers need pay raises & public schools need adequate funding. State employees deserve pay raises. Retirees need cost-ofliving increases. Rainy day funds should be infused into the education of needed workers, like, mental health counselors & nurses.

across the county. Develop coalitions with other counties to expand work on interconnectivity. Build on the commissioners court commitments to existing resources that serve our most vulnerable communities and not just those in the City of Austin, but in areas like Manor, Del Valle, and Pflugerville.

Healthcare: Our county jail, like most county jails across Texas, is both the single largest line item in our budget, and

the largest mental health facility in the county. This is unac-

ceptable. We are working to establish a mental health diversion center to provide people the resources they need to stop circling through the criminal justice system ending back on the streets, and instead to find stability.

Other Issue: I am most concerned about election integrity. With electronic voting machines in the neighborhoods and electronic counting machines downtown, there is huge opportunity for election fraud, and I would go so far as to say they were implemented for that purpose. We need to go back to small 1000 person precincts that can monitor their election process and count their own paper ballots.

Offering virtual court hearings and online dispute resolution has allowed many individuals who are without transportation to attend their court hearing. Evictions: We created an information page on our website dedicated to self-represented litigants. Information packets for both those who have an eviction case filed against them, and for those seeking to file an eviction case are available. We also created a resources page with information including the rules for Justice Court, links to legal assistance, the Austin Tenants Council and the Law Library.

Equal Access: Simple steps such as allowing a person to ask questions with follow-up to make sure they were heard or inviting feedback from individuals during and after the legal

Affordable housing stock has not kept up with our growth. . In Taylor, it has been virtually dismantled due to flood damage. Williamson County needs a homeless shelter and a comprehensive plan to address increasing affordable housing. We also need to fully support the federal Home Investment Partnership Program (the "HOME Program"). **Transportation:** We are facing exponential growth in East WilCo and County Commissioners are the supervisors of the public road. Road maintenance is not glamorous but county government is charged with building, maintaining and fixing our roads and bridges. We must increase the maintenance budget to improve and maintain our county roads and we must respond to constituents about potholes and road safety issues.

Healthcare: County Commissioners through the County Health Department are responsible for establishing, maintaining, and funding services that support mental and public health of the community. I have experience working in Mental and Public Health. I believe in public health. They are there to protect us. In order to promote a healthy community, our public health system needs to be supported and funded.

Evictions: Our court puts information on both our website and in the hearing notices that are sent out. In addition, our court verbally advises (not legal advice) landlords and tenants of area resources available. Evictions are sensitive for both parties and we are mindful of that.

Moving to a treatment + temporary shelter approach so we can identify the specific needs of each individual in order for them to become self sustainable and not dependent on the government should be the top priority. Unless the cities goal is to create a dependent class of individuals.

Public Health: Fentanyl is a major problem in America right now. We are seeing overdoses in the homeless populations & in our schools. 3 CISD students died in the last month from fentanyl overdose. We need to shutdown our open drug market & go after drug dealers and not the victims they sell to. Combined with Central Health to provide mental health services to those who maybe depressed or self medicating. **Growth:** Currently Austin leaks 6.5 billion gallons of water each year. The last decade we've lost enough water to fill lake Travis 1.5 times. Compounded with boil water notices nearly every year we need to prioritize our water infrastructure so it can sustain future growth of a potential population that will surpass 3 million possibly by 2040 to maintain safe

Housing: We need more affordable housing and commercial development. But we also need every tool at our disposal to assist victims of recessions/depressions caused by banks, wars, and pandemics. Research on recessions shows people unemployed during a downturn struggle to reenter the labor force and fall into a "poverty trap." We need to treat both the symptom (houselessness) and the illness (poverty).

Public Health: My focus here is on the long-term financing for the initiatives currently funded by the opioid settlement. Putting those funds in an endowment ensures permanent funding with greater effect well into the future. This will keep the budget ahead of not only inflation but increases in service demand, as is bound to happen in a city that grows 85 percent in 20 years, with no sign of slowing down.

Growth: I've lived without a car for 10+ years and used transit everywhere: Hong Kong, DC, London, and Austin! Between now and Project Connect we need a DC-"Circulator" type bus system, with bus line transfers at singular stops and connections to primary destinations: Domain, Austin-FC, UT, the Capitol, downtown, East 6th, and Zilker. I would also make existing bike lanes and sidewalks protected.

Other Issue: To address inequality, we need to think in decades instead of years. I'd establish: 1) a city-managed insurance fund for worker sick leave/disability, 2) a match program for workers' retirement, and 3) a people's endowment to finance the city's future social services. Combined, in the long run, these policies would decrease demand for services, increase service capacity, and reduce the tax burden.

Unhoused population: I expanded the city's Workforce First program and the Clean Creeks Crew offering paid work as an alternative to panhandling, support the purchase of hotels in business districts, and The Other Ones Foundation and Community First. Public Health: Mental Health: We must continue the Mental Health option for those who call 911, increase support for Integral Care (our local partner for mental health response), and advocate for the expansion of healthcare by the State of Texas. Drug Overdoses: Drug overdoses are a public health crisis, and I am working with a colleague on other measures the city can take to protect individuals from overdose. **Growth:** Roads: Austin's roads were designed for fewer vehicles than we have now. To address this, I've voted to reduce speeds on neighborhood streets, add speed bumps,

crosswalks with hybrid beacons, and protected bike lanes. Utilities: I called the special council meeting to address Austin Water's boil water notices, increased funding for more staff at treatment plants, and upgraded old facilities.

Other Issue: I am passionate about environmental responsibility on housing and road projects. I believe that Austin can be a leader in gun safety, and I authored the city's policy on free gun locks. And I am pro-choice and I co-sponsored the city's GRACE Act which directs police to deprioritize state laws on abortion.

Growth: I will propose an initiative I call "More Routes, More Buses." I would like to see the large-scale buses replaced by the smaller electric 15-passenger vans that run every 15 to 20 minutes. I believe the key to getting people to use the bus system is reducing trip ETAs. I also think that some sections of the city should be closed off to cars allowing only buses, bikes and scooters in these areas.

Other Issue: I believe that most of the city's chronic issues boil down to a lack of investment in mental health care. I would like to see community social programs that promote health care and talk therapy for everyone. I believe this would alleviate homelessness, crime, and even affordability and foster a stronger sense of community.



Antonio D. Ross

Qualifications: I am a resident of Austin, A taxpayer, and a father that is very active in my community. I have studies in early childhood education, and a military background. (US Army).

Housing: Navigating through the rising cost of housing has been difficult but can be achieved. My focus on this issue is to propose rezoning, and expansion of where land can be de-

I would focus homelessness efforts on recovery and underlying causes of homelessness, such as trauma or addiction, not simply a lack of housing. I would also focus on more private sector involvement.

Public Health: Additional steps include a focus on rehabilitation of those with drug dependencies (not just harm reduction) and a closer working relationship between APD and the State to target dealers and traffickers. APD's narcotics unit should also be fully staffed. Mental health services can be improved by increasing funding for drug addiction and trauma recovery, particularly for the homeless.

Growth: Managing growth first requires proactively taking care of the infrastructure we already have, including fixing roads, sidewalks, and utility deficiencies. I would oppose developments that do not comply with Austin's environmental protections. Traffic safety is improved primarily by speed reduction. I would include APD traffic enforcement as part of Austin's speed reduction efforts.

Other Issue: Public safety. The 911 call center, APD, and EMS are woefully understaffed, leading to longer response times and more crime. I would increase APD classes and focus on hiring and pay for our public safety personnel. I would focus on retention of experienced public safety personnel. I would also pursue an independent audit of Austin Water and Austin Energy.

Public Health: We must increase EMS funding and training for first responders, and add Narcan machines in high drug

use areas. We should invest in communities and initiate pilot programs for income assistance, community health centers, and food and medical aid. We must also build more affordable housing, and temporary and permanent supportive housing to get people off of the streets and into treatment. **Growth:** We must invest in all travel modes to safely manage growth. Fixing I35 will improve traffic safety and efficiency. Implementing Project Connect and dedicating rightof-way for buses on corridors will greatly improve transit. Completing the sidewalk system and the urban trail network, and adding protected bike lanes will make it safer and easier for pedestrians and bikers to traverse the city. BOND ELECTION—PROPOSITION A

Background

A political action committee made up of local non-profits called the Affordable Housing Bond PAC lobbied the Austin City Council to approve a \$300 million bond proposal to combat Austin's affordability crisis. A majority of the city council voted to increase the bond package to \$350 million and place it on the November ballot. The last City of Austin affordable housing bond was in 2018 when voters approved a \$250 million bond.

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$350,000,000 in tax-supported general obligation bonds and notes for planning, designing, acquiring, constructing, renovating, improving and equipping affordable housing facilities for low and moderate income persons and families, and acquiring land and interests in land and property necessary to do so, funding loans and grants for affordable housing, and funding affordable housing programs, as may be permitted by law; and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay for the bonds and notes.

Explanation

Proposition A, if passed, will cost \$350 million for housing priorities such as low-income rental housing and homeownership, permanent supportive housing, home repairs for lowincome residents, preservation of existing affordable housing, land acquisition, and the development of affordable housing on public land.

The city estimates that if the bond passes, taxpayers with a home worth \$448,000 would pay approximately \$46.60 more in taxes per year.

PROPOSITION A

Ballot Language

The reauthorization of the local sales and use tax in the City of Georgetown, Texas at the rate of one-fourth of one per-

cent to continue providing revenue for maintenance and repair of municipal streets.

Explanation

Georgetown voters initially approved a dedicated quartercent sales tax for street maintenance and repairs in 2002. State law requires that voters approve the reauthorization of the sales tax every four years. The sales tax applies to all purchases made within Georgetown's city limits by residents and non-residents. The reauthorization will not increase the sales tax rate in Georgetown.

If voters cast their ballots against the reauthorization, that sales tax will expire "on the first day of the first calendar quarter occurring after the fourth anniversary of the date the tax was last reauthorized." Texas Tax Code, Section 327.07.

The Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority, known as CapMetro, is a public transportation provider based in Austin. The City of Lago Vista pays one cent of the city's sales tax to CapMetro and in return is served by a bus route that takes passengers to the Lakeline MetroRail Station and by CapMetro's on-demand pick-up services.

Ballot Language

Shall the Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority be continued in the City of Lago Vista?

Explanation

If Proposition A passes, Lago Vista will continue to pay one cent of the city's sales tax to CapMetro and continue to receive the currently offered services. If the proposition fails, Cap Metro will stop providing services, and Lago Vista will need to pay an exit fee of \$6 million, but will stop paying sales tax to CapMetro. Additionally, if Proposition A fails, voters will reconsider the sales tax rate in Proposition B.

PROPOSITION B: General Revenue Sales Tax

Background

The City of Lago Vista collects a two cent sales tax for every dollar spent in the city. One cent goes to CapMetro and one cent goes to the general fund. If Prop A fails, voters will reconsider the sales tax rate for the city.

Ballot Language

Conditional Upon a Majority "NO" Vote on **Proposition A**

The adoption of a local sales and use tax in the City of Lago Vista at the rate of two percent (2%).

Explanation

If Proposition B fails and Proposition A passes, the city will continue to have a 2% sales tax, but all the sales tax revenue will go to the city's general fund.

The issuance of \$17,500,000 bonds by the City of Lakeway, Texas, for streets, sidewalks, pathways, bike and pedestrian system improvements. Taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds will be imposed.

Explanation

This transportation bond package authorizes the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds in a principal amount of not more than \$17,500,000 for various transportation projects that may include, but are not limited to: right-of-way acquisition for the future widening of RM 620, traffic signalizations, culvert improvements, sidewalk construction, and road construction projects and road resurfacing work on Lakeway Boulevard, Lakeway Drive, Lohman's Crossing, Main Street, and Birrell Street.

City Staff analysis of the package indicates that this bond would increase the taxes the average homeowner in Lakeway pays by an estimated \$6.58 per month.

Ballot Language

Shall the Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority be continued in the City of Manor?

Explanation

If Proposition A is passed, the City of Manor will continue to pay one cent of the city's sales tax to CapMetro and continue to receive the currently offered services. If the proposition fails, Manor will immediately stop receiving CapMetro services but will continue to pay CapMetro the 1% sales tax until the city's net financial obligation is met. The city estimates this will be in 2026. Additionally, if Proposition A fails, voters will reconsider the sales tax rate in Proposition B.

PROPOSITION B: Sales Tax for General Revenue Purposes

Background

The City of Manor collects a two cent sales tax for every dollar spent in the city. One cent goes to CapMetro and one

cent goes to the general fund. If Prop A fails, voters will reconsider the sales tax rate for the city.

Ballot Language

Conditional Upon a Majority "NO" Vote on Proposition A

The adoption of a local sales and use tax in the City of Manor at the rate of two percent (2%).

Explanation

If Proposition B is passed, the city will continue to have a 2% sales tax, but all the sales tax will go to the city's general fund after the city pays its financial obligations to CapMetro, estimated to be in 2026.

LOCAL CITY OF MANOR

CHARTER AMENDMENTS

Background

The Manor city charter is required to be reviewed every two years. A municipal charter is a legal document that establishes a town and defines its powers, rather like the constitution of a city. City council and staff reviewed the charter in 2022, and eight amendment propositions were approved by the city council to be placed on the ballot.

PROPOSITION C

Ballot Language

Shall Section 3.05(c) of the City Charter be amended to delete the requirement that vacancies must be filled within 45 days from the date the vacancy occurs?

PROPOSITION D

Ballot Language

Shall Section 3.06 of the City Charter be amended to require that: Council members attend each committee meeting to which the council member is assigned; Council adopt a policy for determining whether an absence is without good and sufficient cause; Council may revoke a prior-excused absence for a Council member who is absent from thirty percent of all regular, special, and committee meetings for the

purposes of removal under Section 3.04 of the City Charter; and providing that a member of Council may not have an excused absence revoked during the first six months in office?

PROPOSITION E

Ballot Language

The issuance of bonds in the amount of \$5,300,000 and the imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds for waterworks system facilities and improvements, including fire flow improvements and acquiring lands and rights-of way for such purposes, and all matters incident or necessary thereto.

Explanation

The Rollingwood City Council voted in August to call an election for two bonds in November. Proposition A, if passed, will cost \$5.3 million for improvements to the city's water system including fire flow availability and upgrades to water mains.



PROPOSITION B

Ballot Language

The issuance of bonds in the amount of \$2,500,000 and the imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds for a combined City Hall and Public Safety Building and related infrastructure.

Explanation

Proposition B, if passed, will cost \$2.5 million to build a combined City Hall and public safety building. Additionally, if proposition B passes and the city reaches an agreement with the emergency services district, a fire and EMT station could potentially be housed at the new public safety building.

Taxpayers with a home worth \$1 million would pay approximately \$355 to \$370 more in property tax a year. However, if proposition B passes and a fire and EMT station is housed in Rollingwood, homeowners could theoretically see a decrease in insurance premiums.

BOND ELECTION

PROPOSITION A

Background

In early 2022, Austin Community College (ACC) Regional Advisory Committees recommended a bond election for new construction and current facility upgrades. The Board of Trustees voted to call an election for a \$770 million general obligation bond for November 2022. The last ACC bond election was in 2014 when voters approved \$385 million in bonds.

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$770,000,000.00 bonds for the purpose of constructing, improving, renovating, and equipping college buildings districtwide for workforce training and general education programs which will include, but not be limited to nursing, advanced manufacturing, skilled trades, and information technology, and for student support services such as onsite child care and student health services, and for the modernization of technology, and with such construction, improvement, renovation, and equipping of college buildings to include, but not be limited to: (1) construction of a new campus at the Pinnacle site in southwest Austin for instructional programs including software development and healthcare; (2) construction of a new campus at the southeast Travis County site for instructional programs including skilled trades, such as welding and automotive technology, and advanced manufacturing; (3) expansion of the

Hays campus for instructional programs including nursing and healthcare; (4) expansion of the Highland campus in central Austin for instructional programs including advanced manufacturing, cybersecurity, and software development; (5) expansion of the Round Rock campus for instructional programs including nursing, advanced manufacturing, and skilled trades such as welding and automotive technology; (6) expansion of the Cypress Creek campus in Cedar Park for instructional programs including cybersecurity and software development; (7) expansion of the downtown Austin Rio Grande campus for instructional programs including computer science and cybersecurity; (8) expansion of the Elgin campus for instructional programs including advanced manufacturing and skilled trades such as welding; (9) expansion of the San Gabriel campus in Leander for instructional programs including advanced manufacturing and skilled trades such as welding; and (10) technology and facility improvements at various campuses including but not limited to Riverside, Northridge, South Austin, and Eastview; and the levying of the tax in payment thereof.

Explanation

Proposition A, if passed, will cost \$770 million and will pay for a new campus for manufacturing and skilled trades in Southeast Travis County, technology and facility improvements at various campuses, and the expansion of the following campuses:

➤ Hays County campus for health sciences;

selective reproduction.

- Highland campus for manufacturing, cybersecurity, and software development;
- > Round Rock Campus for nursing, manufacturing, and skilled trades;
- Cypress Creek Campus for cybersecurity and software development;
- Rio Grande campus for computer science and cybersecurity;
- Elgin campus for manufacturing and skilled trades; and
- > San Gabriel campus for manufacturing and skilled trades.

New taxable growth (such as new neighborhoods and commercial developments) and increasing property values in the ACC district will pay for most of the bond. However, some taxpayers may see a small increase. For example, taxpayers with a home worth \$500,000 would pay up to \$5 a year over the first five years, maxing out at \$25/year for the remainder of the bond.

School Safety: Each campus should be assessed individually to determine deficiencies. Most schools were built a long time ago and planners did not consider the level of security that is required at this time. We need to determine campus policies, sometimes specific to the campus, and improve safety infrastructure where necessary. We also need to search for state and federal dollars for support.

Other Issue: Teacher and Staff Retention and Recruitment. We must find new ways to support our teachers and staff. One measure that I plan to implement is to provide toll tags to all of our teachers and staff. Many of our teachers and staff cannot afford to live in Austin and this is a means to help them in their commute without costing them during their commute.

LOCAL BOND ELECTION

Background

In the Spring of 2022, AISD's Bond Steering Committee, comprising both appointed and elected members, held 15 meetings and recommended that a bond election be called to address infrastructure issues. The committee recommended several bond proposals; the AISD administration also released recommendations. The Board of Trustees voted to call an election with three separate propositions based on a combination of the steering committee and the

administration's bond proposals for a total of \$2.25 billion. The last Austin ISD bond election was in 2017 when voters approved a \$1.05 billion bond.

PROPOSITION A

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$2,316,025,000 school building bonds for the design, construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, renovation,

expansion, improvement and equipment of school buildings in the district (including but not limited to improvements to enhance safety, security, and energy efficiency) and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor and the purchase of new school buses, and levying and imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Required statement for all school district bond propositions pursuant to Section 45.003, Texas Education Code: this is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition A, if passed, will cost \$2.3 billion for district-wide infrastructure improvements including full or phased modernizations of eight high schools, five middle schools, and thirteen elementary schools; safety improvements including upgraded doors, locks, fencing, and secure entry vestibules at every campus; energy efficiency updates including HVAC, plumbing, and roof repairs; the expansion of career and technical space; and bus upgrades.

Explanation

Proposition C, if passed, will cost \$47.4 million for athletic improvements including turf, lighting, and seating at every high school athletic facility and the full renovation of Nelson Field.

Will this include a tax increase? If all three propositions were to pass, the debt service portion of the school district's tax rate would increase by 1 cent per \$100 of value. However, the Board of Trustees has voted to decrease other tax rates, resulting in a decrease in the overall tax rate even if the entire bond package passes.

LOCAL LAKE TRAVIS ISD

BOND ELECTION

Background

In the spring and summer of 2022, Lake Travis ISD's Facilities Planning Committee made up of parents, community members, and business owners held five meetings and afterward recommended that a bond election be called to expand facilities, upgrade technology, and improve athletic infrastructure. The Board of Trustees voted to call an election with three separate propositions based on the committee's recommendations, for a total of \$703 million. The last Lake Travis ISD bond election was in 2017 when voters approved \$253 million in bonds.

PROPOSITION A

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$548,410,330 of bonds by the Lake Travis Independent School District for school facilities, the necessary sites for school facilities, and new school buses, and the levying of a tax in payment thereof. This is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition A, if passed, will cost \$548.4 million and will provide elementary shade structures, additional classroom space for special programs, door hardware replacement, new science classrooms, architectural and structural improvements, a new basketball arena at Lake Travis High School,

additions to the administration building and educational development center, a new maintenance and food and nutrition services building, and a facility condition assessment.

PROPOSITION B

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$60,790,110 of bonds by the Lake Travis Independent School District for school technology improvements and the levying of a tax in payment thereof. This is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition B, if passed, will cost \$60.79 million and will provide technology upgrades to existing facilities and new buildings. Technology items include staff and student devices; improvements to existing facilities in cabling, wireless, cameras, access controls, classroom and campus AV; and network, telecommunications and classroom and campus AV for new campuses.

PROPOSITION C

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$93,799,560 of bonds by the Lake Travis Independent School District for school stadium facilities and the levying of a tax in payment thereof. This is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition C, if passed, will cost \$93.8 million and will provide school stadium facilities including a football stadium, track, concession stands, field house, baseball and softball fields, and tennis courts at high school #2, athletic turf replacement, PE space, and sound system at Hudson Bend Middle School, athletic turf replacement at Lake Travis Middle School, and baseball and softball turf replacement, concession stands, stadium renovations, field house additions, golf hitting bays and putting greens, light replacements, new fencing, and other facility upgrades at Lake Travis High School.

None of the propositions are projected to raise the school district's property tax rate; new taxable growth (such as new neighborhoods and commercial developments) and increasing property values in Lake Travis are projected to cover the cost.

Why does the proposition say this is a tax increase if it will not increase the tax rate? The passage of the bond will increase the amount of debt the ISD owes and, in the longterm, how much tax Lake Travis will collect.

School Safety: We have completed construction of security vestibules on our campuses and, as a member of the LISD School Safety & Security Committee, I get to witness first-hand our district working alongside local law enforcement to increase school safety & security. Other Issue: How do you pick just one?! The issue is student learning (engagement; critical thinking; class ratios) - but it doesn't stand alone. A focus on learning requires that attention also be placed on teachers and staff (fewer mandates; retention; benefits and pay), school finance (growth planning; efficient and informed budgeting), and community needs (academic aims; parent support; good governance).

SPECIAL ELECTION

PROPOSITION A: Attendance Credit Election (ACE)

Ballot Language

Authorizing the board of trustees of Leander School District to purchase attendance credit from the state with local tax revenues.

Explanation

When a school district's tax revenue exceeds its entitlement under various provisions of the Texas Education Code, the state is entitled to "recapture" those amounts. State Law requires that voters approve the process of making mandatory recapture payments in an Attendance Credit Election (ACE).

According to the Leander ISD website, if the measure passes, "the school district would make its mandatory recapture payments to the state as required under Texas law. The vote would not change anything within the school district."

If the measure fails, the Leander ISD website states that "the school district would be subject to a 'Detachment of Territory,' meaning the state will detach a portion of the school district's total property value equal to the amount de-

termined through recapture. However, this Detachment of Territory is permanent and irreversible, even if in future years the property values within the district make it no longer subject to recapture. As a result, the school district might need to raise the I&S tax rate to pay existing debt." "I&S" refers to Interest & Sinking and this portion of collected taxes cannot be used to fund salary increases or maintenance and operations.

PROPOSITION B: Voter-Approval Tax Rate Election (VATRE)

Ballot Language

Ratifying the ad valorem tax rate of \$1.2746 in Leander Independent School District for the current year, a rate that will result in an increase of 35 percent in maintenance and operations tax revenue for the district for the current year as compared to the preceding year, which is an additional \$99,041,063.

Explanation

According to the Leander ISD website, "if the Board of Trustees adopts an M&O (Maintenance and Operations)

tax rate that is greater than the calculated rate set by law, this triggers a VATRE. If the voters do not approve the VATRE, then the M&O rate reverts to the maximum allowed under state law."

If LISD voters, by approving Proposition B, ratify the tax rate adopted by the Board of Trustees, the district would see a \$30 million increase in revenues to support the increases in pay approved by the Board on May 19 in the 2022–23 compensation plan. The additional revenues would also reduce the amount of cuts needed from existing personnel and programs. Importantly, even if the VATRE is approved, the overall property tax rate in LISD will be 6 cents lower than last year's rate, due in part to a decrease in the I&S portion of the tax rate.

If Proposition B (the VATRE) does not pass, the district would lose out on any additional revenue and could be left with a budget deficit of nearly \$35 million for the 2022–23 school year. While the fund balance would cover the costs for that school year, the school district would need to make spending cuts that could result in fewer teachers working in the district. LISD would also consider restructuring or eliminating certain programs that LISD students and families have come to expect.

SPECIAL ELECTION

PROPOSITION A

Background

In 1993, the state of Texas passed the Robin Hood law, a law that recaptures tax dollars from property-wealthy districts and redistributes the dollars to less wealthy districts across Texas. Pflugerville ISD is now considered a property-wealthy district by state standards. The state of Texas will require voters to approve Pflugerville ISD to make the mandatory recapture payments through the purchase of attendance credit at a required, one-time election.

Ballot Language

Authorizing the board of trustees of Pflugerville Independent School District to purchase attendance credit from the state with local tax revenues.

Explanation

If Prop A is passed, Pflugerville ISD will make the mandatory recapture payments required by the Robin Hood law through the purchase of attendance credit. If Prop A fails, the Texas Education Agency will send a portion of Pflugerville ISD's land to another school district in order to reduce Pflugerville's total property value. The Texas Education Agency will select the portion of land, and students who live in that area will be annexed to the new school district.

PROPOSITION B

Background

School districts have different types of tax rates that can fund different parts of the district. A Voter Approved Tax

Ratification Election (VATRE) is an election required by the state of Texas to ask voters to approve a modified tax rate.

Ballot Language

Ratifying the ad valorem tax rate of \$1.2646 per \$100 valuation in Pflugerville Independent School District for the current year, a rate that will result in an increase of 21.37 percent in maintenance and operations tax revenue for the District for the current year as compared to the preceding year, which is an additional \$38,146,329.

Explanation

If Prop B is passed, Pflugerville ISD will increase the tax rate to \$1.26 per \$100 valuation, and this will fund an increase in the maintenance and operations budget that is used to fund everyday operating expenses like teacher salaries and classroom materials.

Will this include a tax increase? Technically, yes, this will include a tax rate increase. However, the Pflugerville Board of Trustees voted to reduce another tax rate, the Interest and Sinking (I&S) tax rate, causing an overall decrease in the tax rate even if Proposition B passes.

PROPOSITIONS C-H

Background

In early 2022, Pflugerville ISD's Citizens Facilities Advisory Committee met eight times and recommended that a \$323,680 million bond election be called for campus improvements. The Pflugerville ISD Superintendent recommended an additional \$43.9 million be added to the bond to purchase land and build affordable teacher housing due to increasing teacher shortages and the rising price of real estate. The Board of Trustees voted to call an election based

on the committee's and Superintendent's recommendations. The last Pflugerville ISD bond election was in 2018 when voters approved \$332 million in bonds.

PROPOSITION C

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$190,280,000 school building bonds for the design, construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, renovation, expansion, improvement and equipment of school buildings in the district and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor and the purchase of new school buses, and levying and imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Required statement for all school district bond propositions pursuant to Section 45.003, Texas Education Code: this is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition C, if passed, will cost \$190,280 million and will provide district-wide safety and security upgrades, additions and renovations to current campuses, the purchase of land for future projects, HVAC and mechanical upgrades, and capital improvement projects designed to address aging conditions and equity across campuses.

PROPOSITION D

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$54,000,000 school building bonds for the design, construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, renovation, expansion, improvement and upgrading of technology systems, including network security improvements and related infrastructure and equipment, and levying and imposition of taxes

sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Required statement for all school district bond propositions pursuant to Section 45.003, Texas Education Code: this is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition D, if passed, will cost \$54 million for technology devices for students and staff and district-wide network security upgrades and technology infrastructure improvements.

PROPOSITION E

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$3,000,000 school building bonds for the design, construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, renovation, expansion, improvement and equipment of performing arts facilities in the district, and levying and imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Required statement for all school district bond propositions pursuant to Section 45.003, Texas Education Code: this is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition E, if passed, will cost \$3 million for renovations to the Pflugerville High School Performing Arts Center and sound system upgrades at all high schools.

PROPOSITION F

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$400,000 school building bonds for the design, construction, rehabilitation, renovation, expansion,

improvement and equipment of stadium facilities in the district, and levying and imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Required statement for all school district bond propositions pursuant to Section 45.003, Texas Education Code: this is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition F, if passed, will cost \$400,000 for stadium improvements such as the wiring of the Pfield for headsets and microphones and a scoreboard replacement at Hendrickson High School.

PROPOSITION G

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$76,000,000 school building bonds for the design, construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, renovation, expansion, improvement and equipment of a district-wide career and technical education center, and levying and imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Required statement for all school district bond propositions pursuant to Section 45.003, Texas Education Code: this is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition G, if passed, will cost \$76 million for a centralized location for career and technical education (CTE) and creation of additional instructional space for CTE programs.

PROPOSITION H

Ballot Language

The issuance of \$43,924,000 school building bonds for the design, construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, renovation, expansion, improvement and equipment of housing for teachers and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and levying and imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Required statement for all school district bond propositions pursuant to Section 45.003, Texas Education Code: this is a property tax increase.

Explanation

Proposition H, if passed, will cost \$43.92 million for the purchase of land and development of up to one hundred 1-2and 3- bedroom units for teachers.

None of Propositions C-H are projected to raise the school district's property tax rate; new taxable growth (such as new neighborhoods and commercial developments) and increasing property values in Pflugerville are projected to cover the cost. Pflugerville ISD also decreased other tax rates this year, reducing the overall tax burden.

Why does the proposition say this is a tax increase if it will not increase the tax rate? The passage of the bond will increase the amount of debt the ISD owes and in the longterm, how much tax Pflugerville ISD will collect.

We should fund more school therapists and counselors to address mental health. Social and emotional wellness are just as critical for student safety. We want kids to stop worrying so they can keep learning. Other Issue: Every student learns differently and there is no one size fits all solution for measuring success. Our diverse communities require an innovative approach to compiling and analyzing testing data to identify trends and opportunities for improvement. We should also offer personal and career development opportunities for teachers and staff so we can attract and develop top talent within our district.

Amber Feller

Qualifications: I have had children in RRISD for the past 18 years in TAG, GenEd and SPED. I also have over 200 hours of public education CEU's while serving as a Trustee. Finally, I have a Master's in Education.

Student Outcomes: Recovering from the COVID learning loss is the biggest issue facing public education currently. RRISD must look at the individual student, identify their deficiencies and develop a targeted plan for significant growth. While standardized testing is important, we must ensure we do not just "teach to the test" and make certain that our students have a robust skill set after high school.

Libraries: I understand and respect that citizens may not always agree with curriculum decisions. As a result, RRISD has a robust book review process that allows parents/guardians to voice their concerns and give feedback. A collaborative review with the community and staff should occur to make decisions best for students and ensure decisions made are within the bounds of law.

School Safety: RRISD had already made substantial investments in school safety including bullet proof film, bus surveillance and GPS monitoring, cameras and panic buttons in portable buildings and visitor access controls, to name a few. RRISD also has their own PD connected with MH services to identify and address threats. However, daily and ongoing vigilance is necessary to ensure the safety of our students.

Other Issue: Another issue our community is facing surrounds teacher staffing and morale issues. I will advocate at the legislature for increased funding for public education and ensure that money passes directly to staff. While a pay raise would certainly be appreciated, RRISD must also focus on teacher morale/retention due to the fact that stress/ pressures are greater than they ever have been since 2020.

RRISD must provide locks for each classroom door. I would like to see a safety rating given to each campus based on random audits of the school's safety measures and I would like for these safety ratings to be made public.

Other Issue: I believe everything rises and falls on leadership and it is imperative that the newly elected board employ a qualified Superintendent. Also, I am a staunch supporter of parental rights and believe that parent's best know the needs of their child.

Student Outcomes: Punitive measures harm students and fail to address their stressors which are only exacerbated by the pandemic. I will reinvest from policing and punishment and put that money towards mental health and disability services. I will maintain health measures as necessary for the most vulnerable members of our community and keep in transparent communication about what measures are in place and why.

Libraries: Book bans disproportionately target books by Black, brown, and LGBTQIA+ authors. I believe that equitable access to knowledge means that students have multiple books from multiple perspectives available to them, and those that are systematically oppressed—namely, books by marginalized authors about marginalized experiences—should be elevated to the same level as those not as oppressed.

School Safety: Administrations must also be accountable when it comes to reports of threats to safety. In the case of many school shootings, students reported the perpetrator's behavior far before the shooting occurred. Every report must be taken seriously and given weight, and preventative measures—such as mental health care—must be implemented to make our campuses safe.

Other Issue: The rate of sexual assault/harassment in our schools is appalling; it must be addressed through comprehensive sex ed including consent and the experiences of LGBTQIA+ individuals. We must also take our students' futures seriously by adopting thorough sustainability goals and reducing our waste as a district. The teacher shortage

must be addressed by giving every educator higher respect

Student Outcomes: It's no surprise students endured learning loss, greater challenges with mental health, and poor coping skills resulting from lowered academic standards, accountability measures, and social isolation. We need to return our focus to academics while also addressing their social/emotional needs. We must pursue parental involvement which is critical to ensuring a holistic approach to

Libraries: There should be a standard protocol for the approval and removal of books. The school district must identify the age-appropriate reading materials from clearly identified criteria established by TEA. Once a book has been flagged as objectionable, it must immediately go through the proper established vetting process.

School Safety: A safety and security audit should have been completed by RRISD PD and threats to campus safety identified. We need to take the results of that audit and address where the greatest threats exist. One of the areas that needs immediate attention is the safety of students and staff who are still currently in portables.

Other Issue: One issue of grave concern is the disparity in reading and math scores across our minority populations. I also feel the academic bar is set too low and the expectations set for them to reach their fullest potential are not in place. Initiate forums that can address and reach out to specific communities.



Jill Farris

Qualifications: Former IT recruiter, wife, mom of three, active volunteer serving as the Serteen parent advisor for Zoi Ora Filos, on several RRHS booster and non-profit boards and in National Charity League.

Student Outcomes: We need to address the academic learning losses caused by the pandemic. Several of our campuses (Forest North and Chisholm Trail) showed marked improvement in closing those learning gaps. We should evaluate those campuses, find out what is working and replicate those strategies throughout the district.

Libraries: If a book can not be read by adults in a public meeting, it should not be read by our children in private. We need to implement the standards set by TEA in their new library content policy. We should have a well defined process in place to address any parent or community concerns in a timely, respectful manner.

School Safety: We need to bring in a third party security consultant to evaluate each campus. This community needs to know that we have the most effective strategies in place to protect our most vulnerable. We should review all of the recommendations set forth by the Safety and Security Committee and establish a process to prioritize and implement those recommendations in a timely manner.

Other Issue: Our district has failed too many students. 40% of our 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th graders are testing below grade level in math and over half of our African American and Hispanic 3rd graders are reading below grade level. When academic excellence becomes a priority, everyone wins. We need to show this community that RRISD cares about these students and that starts with improving those test scores.



Alicia Markum

Qualifications: Collaborative volunteer serving the district as a PTA President, diversity and inclusion leader, and special education advocate to build community and equitable opportunities for stu-

dent success.

Student Outcomes: Promote an aggressive plan to close learning gaps for all students, including resources to educate district leadership about equity and accessibility issues for historically underserved student populations. Drive clarity on how to access district mental health centers and training on social-emotional tools such as restorative practice and trauma-informed care to improve and maintain well-being. **Libraries:** Parents have the right to determine what their child reads, and schools have mechanisms in place to ensure this right. Librarians have the expertise to determine what books should be available for all students at their schools. Our world is vast and diverse, and we need to give our kids an opportunity to see themselves in it and as well as learn that there are different ways to move through it.

School Safety: Expand mental health resources with more staff and community partnerships, equity training for staff on inclusive best practices and language, and increase early identification rates for special education services. Ensure effective safety protocols that consider the unique populations on each campus. Strengthen student community which leads to lower incidences of violence and bullying.

Other Issue: RRISD has done a great job growing the opportunities offered to students, but it is not always clear how to navigate those choices. The community wants transparency and simplicity in the various academic paths to better prepare students for post graduation goals. We need to look at common patterns in course selections to determine issues that may be working at a disadvantage to some students.

Student Outcomes: I'll continue to fight for the financial resources to attract and retain the best qualified, skilled educators needed to address the effects of the pandemic, as well as the funds for mental health services by advocating for an increase to the Basic Allotment and Safety and Security Allotment at the Texas Legislature. Neither allotment has increased since 2019, not even for inflation.

Libraries: The district has a robust policy regarding the challenging of library books and is working to improve it. And some books have been removed using that policy by administration due to inappropriate content. Parents always have the right to restrict the books their children can check out. But when someone wants to restrict what others can have access to, a thorough process is vital.

School Safety: Currently, a district safety audit is underway, and our new Chief of Police is meeting with campus admin teams to find ways to improve. But I believe the key is prevention, which is why I voted for a \$10M+ annual investment in mental health services and support the RRISD PD school policing model, which partners with social workers for prevention and promotion of positive student outcomes.

Other Issue: Affordability in RRISD is a critical issue. Skyrocketing property values have resulted in rising ISD property taxes. Lawmakers passed property tax protections in 2019, but those laws are proving insufficient, especially for renters. I'll advocate at the Texas Legislature for revisions, so RRISD taxpayers aren't shouldering the burden of adequately financing public schools with little state help.

LOCAL TAYLOR ISD

BOND ELECTION

PROPOSITION A

Ballot Language

The issuance of an amount not to exceed \$82,470,000 school building bonds for the safety improvement, construction, renovation, acquisition, and equipment of school buildings in the district, the purchase of the necessary sites for school buildings, and the purchase of new school buses and the levying and imposition of taxes sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. This is a property tax increase.

Explanation

The Taylor ISD Community Advisory Committee (CAC) met over several months to review the needs of Taylor ISD, from maintenance and upgrades to new projects. The CAC, a group of stakeholders that included citizens, parents, and school employees, unanimously recommended that the Board of Trustees hold a bond election for the aggregate amount of just over \$82.4 million. The Taylor Board of Trustees accepted the CAC's recommendation and voted in August 2022 to call a bond election to be held on November 8, 2022.

Proposition A, if passed, will cost 82,465,778 and improve facility safety, acquire land for new schools, add Career and Technical Education (CTE) classrooms at Taylor High School, and assure that Taylor's elementary schools have adequate space and furniture.

The bond will not increase the Taylor ISD tax rate. However, Texas law passed in 2019 requires that ballot language for bond elections includes this phrase: "This is a property tax increase."

Taylor ISD's total tax rate for the 2022 tax year, is \$1.28 per \$100 of assessed valuation. This rate is divided between M&O (Maintenance and Operations), \$0.94, and I&S (Interest and Sinking), \$.034, and represents the lowest district tax rate since 2008.

The bond election should not affect the tax bill for anyone over the age of 65, provided the eligible homeowner has applied for the exemption that includes a tax ceiling freeze that is available for homeowners aged 65 or older.





MAJOR CHANGES TO TEXAS ELECTION LAW AND HOW THEY MIGHT AFFECT YOU

In 2021, the Texas legislature passed a new law, Senate Bill 1, that significantly changes election law and voting in Texas. Note: This article does not include all the provisions of SB1. For a more comprehensive overview of the changes, visit the Texas Secretary of State's website here: www.sos.texas.gov/elections/laws/advisory2022-08.shtml

- 1. Public Officials/Election Officials Are Silenced Regarding Ballot By Mail (BBM) Public officials and election officials **CANNOT**:
 - > Solicit a BBM application from a person who did not request an application
 - **Distribute a BBM application** to a person who did not request the application
 - > Authorize or approve the expenditure of public funds to facilitate third-party dis**tribution of a BBM application** to a person who did not request the application
 - Complete any portion of a BBM application and distribute the application to an applicant.

Since the LWV and other nonprofit organizations that conduct voter registration and voter education activities are not public officials, we may distribute VBM applications and provide information about them, including educating voters about how to fill them out correctly. If you have any questions about Ballot By Mail or need an application, please contact the LWVAA at LWVaustin.org or 512-451-6710. There is a clear, step-bystep instruction sheet at LWVTexas.org/votebymail.

In addition, the LWVTX collaborated with the Center for Civic Design to redesign the BBM application, and it is now available in a much more readable format. This version was approved by the Secretary of State, and it is officially acceptable to apply for your ballot using the new, cleaner form with a larger font size. To get that form, go to LWVTexas .org/votebymail.

2. The ID Requirements for Ballot By Mail Have Changed

Voters must now include identification numbers on their application for a ballot (in Box 1) and on the ballot return carrier envelope (underneath the flap). **Applications** and/or Ballots will be rejected if the number provided doesn't match what's in the official voter file, if you left the spaces blank, or if you used an old application that doesn't have the spaces for the ID numbers.

You must provide:

Either your TX driver license or TX personal ID card (if it's an expired card, that's OK)

- ➤ The last four digits of your social security number
- ➤ If you have none of the above, you can check a statement to that effect on the application

Prior to the new Election law, ID was not required to apply for a mail ballot: elections officials checked BBM applications against the voter record, and issued mail-in ballots when they matched. This new requirement led to thousands of BBM applications and ballots being rejected during the March primary because voters either forgot which ID they originally used to register, or they used old forms, or they missed the question all together.

To be safe, the LWVAA recommends that you provide BOTH NUMBERS—your Texas driver's license number AND the last four digits of your social security number (see illustration from LWVTX resources).

3. Pregnant Women Near Their Delivery Date Are Now Entitled to Vote By Mail

The new law adds a fifth reason you are permitted to vote by mail: if you are expected to give birth within three weeks before or after Election Day. As a reminder, Ballot by Mail is not open to everyone in Texas. You must fall into one of the following categories in order to be eligible to do so:

- > 65 years of age or older (If you are over 65, you can apply just once for the year and be enrolled in Vote By Mail for every election in that year. If you're under 65, you must apply each election.)
- ➤ Have a disability, defined in Texas Election Code 82.002(a)
- > Expect to give birth within three weeks before or after Election Day
- > Expect to be absent from the county for the entirety of early voting and on Election Day (reasons you might be out of the county include for school, military service, workrelated or leisure travel, and so forth. You must be able to provide the dates of your absence and an address where your ballot can be sent.)
- ➤ Confined in jail or involuntary civil commitment but otherwise eligible

4. Providing Assistance with BBM Now Requires More Information

Those who help someone fill out a Ballot by Mail application—for example, an elderly family member, a non-English speaker, or someone who has a disability—have additional fields to fill out on the form, including:

- ➤ Relationship to the voter
- > "Whether the person received or accepted any form of compensation or other benefit from a candidate, campaign, or political committee in exchange for providing assistance"

Those providing assistance to voters must still provide information in fields previously included on the form:

- > Signature
- > Printed name
- Residence address

5. You Must Complete Additional Paperwork if You Are Helping People Access Curbside Voting

People who assist with curbside voting and are not related to the voters they are helping—such as a driver for an assisted living facility or church group—must fill out a new form if they provide transportation to the polling place to seven or more curbside voters at the same time. The new form requires:

- Name and address
- ➤ Whether the person is only providing transportation, or also assistance

6. DPS Is Conducting Monthly Voter Roll Checks

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is now conducting monthly voter roll checks to "verify" citizenship status.

- > Those voters flagged by the DPS database as non-citizens must submit proof of citizenship if the record from DPS is dated **AFTER** the person's voter registration became effective.
- ➤ Proof of citizenship is one of the following:
 - ➤ Voter's birth certificate
 - ➤ US passport
 - Certificate of naturalization
 - ➤ "Any other form prescribed by the secretary of state"

- Host informative Candidate Forums and promote voter education
- Fund programs like First Vote! offering high school students voter registration and civic education
- Advocate at the local level to Empower Voters and Defend Democracy
