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

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

Don't Go Away Mad, Just

If legislators want to break up with Austin, they should at least put their backs into it

Former state Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, who currently awaits sentencing for federal tax evasion (he pleaded guilty in late October), was the last legislator I remember before the current crop

who trotted out a bill to turn Austin into a state-run govern-**AUSTIN** ment district, like D.C. (or Mexico City) but unlike any **AT LARGE** other state capital. This was BY MIKE CLARKaround 20 years ago when he was mad at the city for wanting to close the former airport -Mueller, now a neighborhood which as a private pilot he found more convenient than Bergstrom, which had already opened. He was also friendly with

the various real estate interests who would go crying to the Legislature whenever Austin asked them not to destroy the very environmental assets that made their land valuable, so Wilson was always ready

with a quote about what trash we are. When he sprung his District of Travis stunt move, he reminded his colleagues that Austin was not a real city, and without the state capital would be "some sleepy town in the hills." (This was about 15 years after the first South by Southwest and 20 years after Dell was founded.)

Wilson got primaried out in 2004, but the idea has been revived by those lovable rogue characters Briscoe 'n' Frisco, the Panderin' Pups - Reps. Briscoe Cain, R-Deer Park, and Jared Patterson, R-Frisco. The latter has prefiled House Bill 714 and House Joint Resolution 50, identical to bills Cain filed last session, which would change the law and ask voters to amend the Texas Constitution to make the new District of, rather than the City of, Austin the seat of state government. This is necessarv because we cannot be trusted to govern ourselves as commies and criminals and antifa supersoldiers, but also annoying vegans and soy boys and I guess also groomers? All at the same time.

TURKEY TROT TO THE POLLS The December 13 runoff election will decide three Council members and Austin's mayor, so don't forget that early voting begins December 1 and runs through December 9. Mail-in ballots need to be postmarked by election day and received by Dec. 14, but we recommend heading to the polls in person if you're sending your ballot late.

A SEAT AT THE TABLE Another stark reminder of Austin's housing crisis: Evictions have skyrocketed in recent months. Travis County Health and Human Services informed county commissioners last week. HHS says it's taken six months just to get through the crisis applications they received in the first two weeks of March when the eviction moratorium lifted.

GRAVY TRAIN As inflation swells the budget for **Project** Connect, the Austin Transit Partnership created to build the Orange and Blue lines is considering ways to cut costs, and, as a result, it seems that some or all of the city's light rail system will need to be at ground level instead of underground. Another cost-cutting measure could mean there will be only one crossing over Lady Bird Lake instead of two.

CONSTRUCTION CASSEROLE Construction is underway at the world's largest community of 3D-printed homes in Georgetown, Community Impact reported. The collaboration between construction tech company ICON. construction company Lennar, architecture firm BIG-Blarke Ingles Group, and developer Hillwood **Communities** is less expensive than traditional building.

STUFFING KIDDOS THIS SUMMER Texas was approved for a fifth round of **Pandemic Electronic Benefit** Transfers through the federal government, Gov. Greg Abbott announced last week. That's \$1.4 billion in benefits for roughly 3.5 million eligible children. Families will receive \$391 per child for summer meal expenses from June 1 to Aug. 30.

MILLENNIAL MASHED POTATOES Austin was apparently the biggest millennial magnet in America in 2021. According to consumer financial site SmartAsset's analysis of 2021 moves from state to state by people aged 25 to 39. New York City hemorrhaged millennials while Austin became home to the most latetwenty-and-thirtysomethings, followed by **Denver**. Dallas, Raleigh, and Jacksonville, Fla.

CRANBERRY S.O.S. As we head into more wintry weather, the state Sunset Advisory Commission staff released last week its reports on the **Public Utility Commission of Texas and Electric Reliability Council** of Texas, which found the agencies "cannot truly fulfill expectations for ensuring a reliable electric grid" due to underfunding and poor "decision-making processes." Fingers crossed.

WE CONTAIN MULTITUDES

The "groomer" bullshit, which was never funny even when it was supposed to be a joke, is no longer something any of us should tolerate or let slide. It is slander and deserves a response to slander - boycotts, lawsuits, breaking some (metaphorical!) teeth. It's extra rich coming from soft-sided young MAGAsexuals like Briscoe 'n' Frisco who have no moral core and rely on the Second Amendment to help them stand upright.

As Cain's disasterlarious tenure atop the House Elections Committee last session showed, you don't want to put these people in charge of anything they might break, and it's not clear that, having OWND us libs, Patterson intends to break a sweat figuring out how to put this idea into practice. HB 714 as written just changes names and adds a requirement to give notice to each chamber of the Lege when City, er, District Council adopts ordinances, including the budget. It doesn't eliminate home rule.

Now, H.J.Res. 50, to ask voters to amend the Constitution, says, "The legislature may enact local laws to govern the operation of the district or to amend or repeal a law, ordinance, order, policy, or other measure adopted by the governing officer or governing body of the district." The Lege generally thinks it has such powers already; this language was crafted by Cain after Steve Adler canceled New Year's Eve and made people sad during the pandemic, which was a rare instance when Austin leaders had the ephemeral power, briefly, to avoid the routine trammeling of local governments and pummeling of their less wealthy citizens at the dumb dead hands of the state.

TOTALLY MISSING THE MOVE

The small-mindedness and lack of imagination of the Lege's Austin bashers has led them to overlook the real alphadog power play of moving the state capital somewhere else, just like Sam Houston intended. That way, Democrats could be forced to spend time and money in the reddest parts of the state: Lubbock or Amarillo, perhaps, or more likely a brandnew city built at great expense and with lousy urban design standards, as in Nigeria or Indonesia or Egypt, also large and messy places contaminated by climate criminals' money. The new Egyptian capital, which doesn't have a name yet, arose from murky real estate transactions controlled by the military at a site only 30 miles from Cairo; it'd be like the state taking a chunk of Caldwell County to make a new Capitol Complex. People are getting paid.

As Austinites we're supposed to flinch at the thought of being ditched this way by Daddy Texas, and I'm sure Adler and the mayors before him would all have protested loudly about us losing our capital jobs and status. (The university stays.) But even 20 years ago, Austin's trajectory was headed into territory where being the capital was a lot less relevant. If we put the question up to a vote in Austin today, who would campaign hard to seek to retain our status, and who wouldn't give a shit? Who might welcome the chance to reduce our contact as a city with the moronic likes of Briscoe 'n' Frisco? What would the rest of Texas say?

Council's Last Stand

Next week's meeting tries to tie up some loose ends

Happy Thanksgiving, everyone. There's understandably not much going on this week in terms of civic events, but things get going again next week, notably with a City Council work session, special called meeting, and regular meeting on consecutive days - Nov. 29-Dec. 1 - as the current lame-duck Council tries to finish up some unfinished business before riding off into the sunset. Wednesday's special is a staff briefing on Project Connect, and on the Light Rail Implementation Plan, which should be very interesting, given the discussions over cost increases and potential value engineering (i.e., cutbacks in the overall plan). **PUBLIC**

Notable on Thursday's regular session agenda is another effort to pass a resolution directing city staff to be more rigorous in their efforts to produce

affordable housing on city-owned land. Kathie Tovo's original motion has run into somewhat surprising opposition on the dais; Mayor Steve Adler has proposed a substitute, much simpler resolution that essentially replaces the detailed instructions in the original with a set of more general and nonbinding recommendations - it can likely pass, but likely doesn't actually accomplish anything. Meanwhile, another resolution reasserts the city's interest in and opposition to a recent **Hays County** move to encourage a new highway across the **Barton Springs** water quality protection lands and the **Barton Springs/Edwards Aquifer** recharge and contributing zones. Elsewhere among the 15 items from Council are a plan to streamline site plan requirements for small (3- to

16-unit) multifamily residential developments, and a move to revamp and expand Austin **Energy's Customer Assistance Program** (see Lina Fisher's story on p.22).

Expect a long public hearing on AE's revised electric rates and charges; no one's happy about that. And likely another long discussion of the proposed amendments to parking and compatibility requirements, and perhaps another about the proposal to allow residential uses in commercially zoned properties. Add in 25 zoning cases, climaxing with a third and

possible final reading of the

Statesman PUD proposal, and it could be a long day indeed. П

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Of Recounts and Run-Offs

Notes from the campaign trail by the News STAFF

Demands for Recount Follow Blue Wave in Hays County

Republicans are questioning the results in two of Hays County's most important elections, 10 days after a blue wave election that saw progressive candidates triumph up and down the ballot. Conservatives Mark Jones and David Puryear, who ran for county judge and district attorney, respectively, requested recounts in their contests on Nov. 17. The recount was expected to take several days.

"It's part of that movement of election deniers," said County Judge Ruben Becerra, who beat Jones to win a second term by 926 votes out of 88,108 cast. "Like Barack Obama said, 'They accept the election results when they win but they don't when they lose.""

Becerra and District Attorney Kelly Higgins have each pledged to reform Hays County's broken criminal justice system. Both were early supporters of **Proposition A**, the ballot initiative to decriminalize possession of small amounts of marijuana, which won an overwhelming 82% of the vote. Both have been fierce critics of outsourcing inmates to jails outside of Hays County due to overcrowding at the jail and the inability or unwillingness of outgoing D.A. Wes

> Mau to put diversion programs in place to keep low-level offenders out of the jail in the first place.

Higgins beat Puryear by a more substantial margin than Becerra did Jones - 5,500 votes, 53% of the vote compared to Puryear's 47%. He questions his former opponent's motives in seeking a recount. "I don't believe there's a possibility of a

good faith recount at that margin," Higgins said. "I believe they're looking to locate or fabricate some grounds for a lawsuit against my taking office or Ruben Becerra's taking office." As of press time, neither Puryear nor Jones had responded to requests for comment from the *Chronicle*. – *Brant Bingamon*

EDUCATION AUSTIN PICKS UNION-ALIGNED CANDIDATE **OVER LONGTIME AISD TEACHER**

Education Austin. the union that represents teachers and classified staff at Austin ISD, has endorsed Zohalb "Zo" Qadri over Linda Guerrero - an AISD teacher for nearly 30 years - in the City Council District 9 run-off. EA does not typically endorse in Council races on its own, but candidates that win the endorsement of the Austin Central Labor Council can claim endorsement from any

individual CLC union. CLC did not endorse in the D9 race this year, so it's notable that EA took the initiative to endorse Qadri and not an AISD teacher. EA President Ken Zarifis said that members felt Qadri would bring "fresh, progressive ideas" to Council and that his "union bona fides are clear," noting that his campaign staff is unionized but Guerrero's isn't. - Austin Sanders

THE REST OF THE TICKER

In the District 3 run-off, **Daniela Silva** got a boost of support from former contenders José Noé Elfas. Bertha Rendon Delgado, and Gavino Fernandez Jr. in her Round 2 with José Velásquez, who led Silva by 2% on Nov. 8, 36%-34%. Together, Elías (endorsed by

the Statesman) and Fernandez secured about 16% of the vote (Rendon Delgado dropped out before the ballot was final)... Velásquez, along with D5 contender Ryan Alter, filed a lawsuit against the city on Nov. 21 over awarding cash from the **Austin Fair Campaign** Finance Fund, which currently holds about \$66,000 in lobbyist registration fees. The city's Law Department has determined that only Silva and Guerrero met the 25-year-old Fair Campaign Ordinance's requirements, and would split the fund. The plaintiffs were promptly denied the restraining order they requested and have decided not to pursue legal action further, so the city plans to distribute the fund to Silva and Guerrero as planned.

AFROTECH COMES TO AUSTIN, HIGHLIGHTS BARRIERS TO EV OWNERSHIP

Last Wednesday, hundreds of entrepreneurs, industry experts, and tech lovers from across the nation gathered at AfroTech, a conference focused on tech and Web3 (a new iteration of the World Wide Web) in Black spaces.

The convention started in 2016 in response to a deficit of Black representation in the tech space. Now, AfroTech is the largest Black tech conference in the U.S. and serves as a national recruiting and innovation hub (although tech companies have been making massive lavoffs in recent weeks, including during the conference). This year's conference, held at the Austin Convention Center, is the first held in Texas. Large firms including PayPal, Amazon, Tesla, and Meta came to recruit and demonstrate support for DEI (diversity, equity, and inclusion) initiatives.

Telva McGruder, chief DEI officer at GM, kicked off the Wednesday speaker panel with a talk about accessibility to electric vehicles for Black communities. McGruder emphasized that although green initiatives are important, socioeconomic barriers in the Black community make it tough to afford electric vehicles. "We're working to create a future that's more sustainable, where people have more access to the things that they need." McGruder said. "In order for us to do that well, we need to have diverse team members."

As of Nov. 17, there were 22,204 electric vehicles registered in Travis County, according to Texas Department of Motor Vehicles data. To increase this number, McGruder emphasized that green and sustainable movements need to be repackaged and thought of through the lens of an individual coming from a minority community.

Jeff Nelson, AfroTech co-founder and chief operating officer of tech media outlet Blavity, moderated the panel and joined McGruder in discussing the issue of working toward an accessible total experience of EV ownership for Black individuals. "The price point can be affordable, but if people can't live with it, charge it, and sustain the ownership of the vehicle" it becomes too difficult for low-income families to use, Nelson said.

McGruder argued that Black communities should care about electric vehicle usage not only to reduce emissions, but to create healthier environments for the next generation of children. But to get that message across, McGruder said, diverse voices need to be present in the room so corporations can address the finer details of accessibility. To get those voices in the room, she emphasized the importance of education in the Black community. "Diversity, equity, and inclusion isn't charity, it's not corporate philanthropy," Nelson said. "It's essential to being a successful business." - Leena Alali





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Changing the Culture

APD sexual assault audit validates survivor concerns

Nearly four years after City Council ordered a comprehensive external audit of the Austin Police Department's management of sexual assault cases, the three organizations tasked with carrying out that audit have delivered their final report. Overall, the report found that while APD has made improvements, much remains to be done.

The Police Executive Research Forum (PERF). Women's Law Project, and the Wellesley Centers for Women worked together on the audit, which experienced numerous delays and cost \$950,000. The work that went into the 182-page report was extensive: reviewing nearly 1.500 sexual assault cases going back to 2012; evaluating internal APD policies for investigating sex crimes; and conducting interviews with Sex Crimes Unit detectives, APD's Victim Services Division, survivor advocates and support groups, and other stakeholders.

Council called for the audit following multiple APD scandals that exposed how the department was failing survivors of sexual assault. Detectives within the SCU frequently and improperly marked cases as "exceptionally cleared" without taking the routine investigative steps required to help survivors achieve justice. (That FBI designation requires strict criteria, which amount to the investigator concluding that the crime cannot be solved despite best efforts.) The department's now-shuttered **DNA crime lab** was so poorly managed that the rape kits used to collect physical evidence of an alleged assault were left to deteriorate in storage for so long that they became unusable in court.

The report makes dozens of recommendations for changing APD's processes and policies to improve its response to sexual assault. Among them: staffing the SCU with detectives outside of regular Monday-Friday hours to more quickly assign cases after sexual assaults are reported; ensuring detectives meet with complainants in person; following up with survivors several times before concluding they are unwilling to proceed with an investigation; and requiring more victim-centered and traumainformed training not only for the SCU but also for patrol officers.


For survivor advocates like Hanna **Senko**, who has devoted the past five years to pushing APD toward reform, the report is welcome but also frustrating. "The issues raised in the PERF report validate the concerns that survivors and advocates have been voicing for years," Senko told us. "While I am glad that these issues have been substantiated, I would expect APD to have been aware of these shortcomings for a very long time. Trust needs to be established with victims, survivors, and the community at large, and it is going to require intentional transparency and change from APD."

Beyond recommendations for reform, the report also provides several valuable data points that APD, advocates, and Council can use as benchmarks. For example, APD (working with third-party DNA labs such as the **Texas Dept. of Public** Safety's crime lab) has been processing rape kits much faster. In 2015, it took an average of 320 days for a rape kit to be processed; by 2020, that number had fallen to 66 days. That's still longer than state law

solved, but the data shows otherwise. The number of cases cleared by arrest remained relatively static from 2012-2020. and as the number of exceptionally cleared cases began to decline in 2017, the number of cases "suspended" began to increase (by 2020, 91% of reviewed cases were suspended). Cases cleared administratively are non-criminal cases, and unfounded cases have been fully investigated and don't lead to an arrest. DATA FROM CITY OF AUSTIN

now requires; a 2019 measure requires law enforcement to process rape kits within 30 days of receipt.

The report also found that APD has improved in how often it closes cases under "exceptional clearance." An explosive 2016 investigation published by Reveal, followed up rigorously by former Chronicle writer Sarah Marloff, found that APD was frequently clearing cases exceptionally without meeting the requisite criteria. PERF found that in 2012, 81% of the 365 exceptionally cleared cases reviewed were improperly assigned that designation; by 2020, that percentage dropped to zero (among a much smaller set of cases, it should be noted).

These are encouraging improvements. But for advocates, understanding why an improvement happened is as important as the improvement itself. The ultimate goal for advocates is to help usher in a culture shift at APD, to erode disbelief of survivors and raise the priority given to staffing and training officers who respond to sex crimes. Police Chief Joe Chacon has said he supports this culture shift, and it was a focus of his confirmation hearing before Council in 2021.

The APD Victim Services Division aided Chacon in this goal, and the division gets multiple shout-outs in the PERF report for setting the standard nationally in how to help victims of sexual assault as they navigate the justice system. But overall, advocates have little evidence of a true culture shift. The decline in "exceptional clearance" cases is not because more cases are being solved, but because they're now classified as suspended (see chart), including more than 90% of the cases reviewed from 2020.

Juliana Gonzales, senior director of sexual assault and health services at SAFE Alliance, stressed the importance of taking a close look at the data that seems to reflect improvement at APD. "It will be critical for the community to deeply explore whether improvements like these are the result of superficial administrative change or a culture shift, because only culture shifts will produce long-term, sustainable change."

For its part, APD says it's committed to working with community partners on implementing recommendations, starting with a small working group to prioritize the recommendations, an APD spokesperson told us. Some recommendations have already been fulfilled: A crime analyst works with SCU and new vehicles have been ordered so that each SCU detective will have their own, for example. APD is set to meet with stakeholders this week to begin the implementation process.

Cyrus Gray had sat in the Havs County Jail for 4½ years, facing a weak case on a capital murder charge, unable to raise a \$250,000 bond. But in a surprise development on Nov. 9, one day after a blue wave election in San Marcos, District Judge Bruce Boyer agreed to lower the bond to \$70,000. Gray was released the next day.

"I was hoping it would happen but I honestly didn't expect it to happen the way it did, so I'm very grateful," Gray told the Chronicle.

"I walked out a door, walked down the sidewalk, and everybody was waiting in the parking lot. I got to hug my mom after almost five years, spend time with my girlfriend, spend time with some good, close friends."

Gray was a physical trainer with no criminal background and no history of violence

when he was arrested in 2018, along with childhood friend Devonte Amerson, for the murder of Texas State student Justin Gage. At his trial this summer, Hays County prosecutors argued that either Gray or Amerson - they couldn't say which - had shot Gage in an attempt to steal an ounce of marijuana. To try to prove their case, prosecutors supplied cellphone tower records placing Gray

and Amerson within about 10 miles of the scene of the murder. They also relied on the testimony of three witnesses who said Gray had told them of a drug deal gone wrong.

However, under cross-examination by Gray's court-appointed attorney Paul Parash, two of the witnesses recanted their testimony on the stand, saying they'd lied after being intimidated by San Marcos detectives. The third witness was shown by Parash to have repeatedly changed his

> story. And, as Parash and others have emphasized, the prosecutors had no eyewitness placing Gray at the scene of the murder, no DNA evidence connecting him to the crime, and no murder weapon. "That's not enough evidence," Parash told us. "You got cellphone towers, which means he was

in San Marcos – and that's about it. You got two people who said they lied and someone else who basically has told many different stories ... and that's the evidence."

Gray's case was ultimately declared a mistrial after several jurors came down with COVID. But Parash said that votes taken at the end of each of four days of jury deliberation showed that at least half the

jurors were ready to vote acquittal. Still, prosecutors immediately announced their decision to retry Gray. The retrial is scheduled for February.

Boyer presided over Gray's trial and Parash speculates that his evaluation of the evidence helped inform the decision to set the bond at \$70,000, which is low for a capital murder charge. Others believe that the assurances of San Marcos social justice group Mano Amiga and its spinoff group Hays County Jail Advocates factored into the judge's decision. Mano Amiga arranged for Gray to stay with a local supporter - one of the conditions of the bond is that he not

return to his parents' home in the Houston area – and also pledged that he would work with the Jail Advocates as a researcher, providing him with a stable income.

Mano Amiga is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, which means it can't support candidates for office, but it has become an important player in Hays County politics nonetheless, with its advocacy for criminal justice reform and in other arenas. The group supported San Marcos' Proposition A this year, the "reeferendum" to decriminalize marijuana use in the city. Mano Amiga set up tables at Texas State and registered over a thousand new voters. Prop A went on to win approval

SETON NURSES RALLY AHEAD OF FIRST BARGAINING MEETING

Last Thursday, Nov. 17, a crowd of more than 100 nurses rallied in front of Ascension Seton Medical Center on 38th, holding a giant banner that read: "Don't mess with Texas nurses." The rally came ahead of the first contract bargaining meeting since Seton nurses unionized in September with the National Nurses Organizing Committee/National Nurses **United**, which represents 3,300 nurses in Texas. The Seton facility is the largest private hospital in the state to unionize. with over 900 nurses represented.

Samantha Steel, who has worked at Seton for eight years, says the union effort was galvanized by chronic understaffing and high turnover, which led to nurses working far outside their job descriptions. "Nurses are performing more than just their nursing job. A lot of times they're having to do the clinical assistants' jobs, the janitorial jobs. The desk clerks have been reduced [and] charge nurses are having to answer phones that are ringing nonstop. Charge nurses are having to take patients because we don't have enough RNs."

Negotiations will be "mainly focused around our patient care protocols, processes, procedures," says Matthew Clark, a nurse for seven years, "as well as staffing efforts to retain the nurses that have the experience that we need as well as acquire new nurses to fill the staffing gaps." Though some of these issues were exacerbated by the pandemic - "a lot of nurses suffered a great deal of moral injury and moral fatigue." Clark says - they've been going on for years.

"We just wanted to show unity in numbers and show Ascension that, you know, over half of the nurses are gathered here," says Clark. "We're hopeful that they will be amenable to our ... patient-centered focus proposals that we are presenting today to them." The same day, organizing nurse Kellen Gildersleeve dropped by the Starbucks on 45th and Lamar to support their national strike, and told Defector, "A lot of our nurses probably stop by this location on the way to work, and we want to support. It's all connected." - Lina Fisher

with 82% of the vote. In the process it drove up progressive voter turnout; Democrats or progressives won 10 of 12 area races. The Hays County Commissioners Court, District Attorney's Office, and three judgeships were flipped from Republican to Democratic control. The turnout may have saved the job of Hays County Judge **Ruben Becerra**, who won by just over 1%.

"Prop A in my opinion won these elections," said **Amy Kamp**, the leader of Hays County Jail Advocates. "Without Prop A, does [Democratic D.A. candidate] Kelly [Higgins] win? Without Prop A, does Ruben squeak in by 800 votes?" (He ended up winning by 926; see p.14 for more.)

Kamp also draws a straight line between the election results and Gray's release. "With it happening on Wednesday, right after the election, it just seemed like the vibe in Boyer's courtroom was very different. When Boyer entered the courtroom, he was like, 'It's a brave new world.' Those were literally the first words out of his mouth."

Meanwhile, Devonte Amerson, accused of the same murder as Gray under Texas' "law of parties," remains locked up with a bond of \$500,000. Prosecutors have spoken in the past of conducting his trial after Gray's, so he will have been held at least five years by the time any trial occurs. Kamp told us she attended the election party of incoming D.A. **Kelly Higgins** on Nov. 8 and asked him about the Gray and Amerson cases. Higgins declined to discuss them. At the *Chronicle*'s request for comment on these cases, Higgins declined.





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It's Just a Bill ...

Prefiling for the next Lege: The good, bad, and MAGA

The action never stops in the capital of the Great State - less than a week after Election Day, prefiling of bills for the 88th Texas Legislature got under way, and now there are more than 1,000 in the queue. (You can find the bill lists at capitol.texas.gov/ reports/general.aspx.)

In the last regular session - not counting the three special sessions of the Endless 87th - a total of 6,927 bills were filed, of which 1,073 were passed, of which 21 were then vetoed by Gov. Greg Abbott. So we're just getting started. Those totals don't include joint resolutions to call for constitutional amendments, of which only four passed, or regular resolutions, of which there were another 3,000 or so. A few of the latter have been prefiled for the 88th, the first of which (House Resolution 6 by Rep. Tom Oliverson. R-Cypress) congratulates the **Houston** Astros for winning the 2022 World Series.

Many bills filed are identical, increasing the chances that one will get lucky, grab the attention of a committee chair, and have a hearing rather than just die pending, as most bills do. This year's earliest birds (the low bill numbers can matter at points in the Lege's arcane procedure) include Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, who represents part of Southeast Austin, and Rep. James Talarico, D-Austin, whose House Bill 21 sets guidelines for an independent citizens redistricting commission (he also filed House Joint Resolution 4 to let Texas voters create that commission). Zaffirini filed the first 39 bills on the Senate list, which is totally in character for her, on a variety of subjects; Senate Bill 31 would enable (and really require) the Electric Reliability Council of Texas to interconnect Texas' stand-alone power grid to the rest of the nation.

The first 20 bill numbers in the House and 30 in the Senate are reserved for what state leaders consider priorities, like banning abortions (last session's SB 8) and punishing pro sports teams for not playing the national anthem (last year's SB 4, a real law that got passed in the 21st century by the governing body of the world's 10th-largest economy). Abbott will lay out his priorities at his **State** of the State address in January, the week after the Lege convenes.

House Speaker Dade Phelan and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick will likely pick up some of Abbott's threads and add some of their own, which in the House will probably be nerdy and in the Senate will be MAGAtastic. Last session, Winter Storm Uri, which shut the Lege down a month into session along with the rest of the state, spawned a flurry of low-numbered bills to address that crisis; Zaffirini is not the only member who thinks that job isn't finished, based on the bill queue.

Six weeks before the 88th gavels in, the Texas GOP, coming off improbably resounding wins earlier this month, has no use or need or time to even pretend to listen to Democratic priorities, which has not

stopped the blue team from filing flurries of bills to make statements, such as redistricting commissions (Talarico's is one of many), expanding Medicaid, legalizing cannabis, banning assault weapons, and, as always, bringing casinos to Texas in the guise of economic development, usually carried by members of color from low-income districts (Senate Joint Resolution 17 by Sen. Carol Alvarado, D-Houston).

The Dems have also filed bills that may help the GOP dial back some of its Fox Newsfueled excesses of the last session(s), which some more centrist Rs have expressed interest in, but which no Republican can risk filing on their own. These include adding rape/

incest exemptions to the state's abortion ban (SB 122 and 123, co-authored by eight Senate Dems including Sen. Sarah Eckhardt, D-Austin), or raising the assault-weapon minimum age to 21 in the wake of Uvalde (Zaffirini's SB 32), or cleaning up the hash made of the Education Code by last year's real-time freakout over "critical race theory" (HB 97 by Rep. **Diego Bernal**, D-San Antonio).

There are no-hope statement bills from the GOP side as well, but unlike the Dems' perennial pushes for better (or any) policy, these are yet more race-to-the-bottom panders to ephemeral know-nothing MAGA bullshit. You may already have heard about HB 643 by Rep. Jared Patterson, R-Frisco,

Cap Metro Issues 7,000 Free Passes for the Unhoused

After months of focused advocacy on behalf of unhoused Austinites by the Texas Harm Reduction Alliance, Capitol Metro this week committed 7,000 free 31-day bus passes to a six-month pilot program to increase transit access. The passes will be distributed by the **Ending Community Homelessness Coalition**'s community partners and the Transit Empowerment Fund, which already helps local nonprofits and basic-needs agencies pay for Cap Metro's reduced-fare programs. TEF's Andrew Levack says the free passes are an extension of that: "The issue raised by advocates was people experiencing homelessness not [being] able to access all the [reduced-fare] passes they needed. A lot of grassroots organizations didn't have the budget to cover the level of demand that was out there."

Levack explains that the program could be incorporated into Cap Metro's new **Amp card**, an account-based system, which would let low-income customers buy more cost-effective daily or monthly passes. The transit agency's Equifare pro-

gram is designed to automatically enroll those below 200% of the federal poverty level or who are receiving social services to be eligible for reduced fares, similar to how Austin

Energy's Customer Assistance Program works. People in the Homeless Management Information System database shared by all local providers would automatically get free trips through the Amp card. Levack says once that is implemented, "where people fall through the cracks in the HMIS system. [we] can still provide passes. That's the perfect case study: If someone is [unhoused], and they want to get into the HMIS system, you need a bus fare to go get case management."

Cap Metro will track the 7,000 passes to see how many rides are being taken. They and TEF will then use that data to determine the true demand, and how much they need to budget to make the program permanent. "Right now, if those riders use all of the fare value, it's about \$2 million a year," says Levack. "That would be a serious budget issue for them to consider. My sense is that the unmet need is much less than

that. When you have multiple organizations issuing 31-day passes, there's a lot of unused fares in that \$2 million."

But Paulette Soltani with THRA says that may not be the case: THRA has requested 350 a month, and in one week has already distributed 200. "We're burning through them; it's a good thing, and it also does worry me a little bit." Soltani says other groups who aren't in the TEF program have also requested passes from THRA, so there may need to be reshuffling based on under or overestimating the demand. "We did raise that [and] TEF was adamant that we could go back to them if we needed to. I feel like we have a really good working relationship."


TEF and Cap Metro will check in with community partners in January, but Soltani has a feeling more passes will be needed before April. She notes that "it was unhoused people who spoke up, they testified at board meetings, they led the charge, and if we don't listen to them, we're gonna miss the needs of our community. I think for so long [unhoused] people in Austin have been hit with horrible policy decisions that have made [their] lives so much more difficult. And finally, [it's] a step in the right direction." Andrew Murr, R-Junction, and Sheryl Cole, D-Austin, are all carrying companion fentanyl bills in the House.)







Power for the People?

A big. contentious AE rate hike finally arrives at Council

In April, Austin Energy revealed a big ask: It wants to change its base rate structure for the first time since 2017. Back then, the city-owned utility gave customers a discount; this time, it wants to do the opposite, saying the basic costs of operating AE (the city's largest department) require more money. The utility's original proposal would have increased the average residential customer's bill by \$20 per month; City Council got that lowered to \$15, but has also, since the rate case began, reluctantly approved another \$15 per month AE rate increase, primarily to cover the rising cost of natural gas. Now, the rate case is reaching its natural end, with Council set to vote on Dec. 1 on some form of base rate increase, with many political balls in play as it does so.

HOW BROKE IS AUSTIN ENERGY?

Even though Council is ultimately AE's board of directors, as a public utility in Texas the city's power company has to go through a statutory administrative hearing process before it can simply change its rate structure - that's the "rate case." Right now, the base rate – the fixed amount on your bill before the charge per kilowatt-hour of electricity you've used – is \$10, about the same as Lubbock and San Antonio, the state's other two large, city-owned utilities. The AE rate structure then has five tiers that charge a customer more the more energy they use. AE wants to raise the base rate to \$25 and move to a three-tier structure, which environmental advocates feel would disincentivize conservation and actually shift a higher cost burden to low-income customers while giving the biggest users a decrease.

AE's reasoning for changing the base rate (also called the customer charge) is simple: It needs to recoup \$90 million in net losses from 2020 and 2021 and avoid them going forward. AE's original "revenue requirement" - the additional funding it wants to bring in each year to do this - was \$48 million a year, which was brought down to \$35 million after negotiation among various stakeholders in the rate case. The judge of the rate case process, the independent hearing examiner, suggested \$31 million.

The independent consumer advocate. John Coffman and his team, hired to represent the interests of residential and small commercial ratepayers in the case, countered with \$6.5 million, for several reasons. The ICA disagrees with the cost audit methodology that AE used to get to \$35 million, and ethically disagrees with the 150% base rate increase, which many stakeholders feel would cause rate shock. "Me and my team feel that there needs to be much more moderation and concern over spreading the pain more equitably across the different sizes of customers," says Coffman.

There are a number of issues Coffman takes with AE's assessment of its revenue requirement, outlined in the ICA's exceptions document, that make the difference between \$35 million and \$6 million. These include disputes about employee head counts in the city's 311 call center (which AE pays for); the size of the transfer AE makes each year into the city General Fund (typically described as the "dividend" that Austinites earn from the utility they own); the impact of the pending sale of AE's old Town Lake Center headquarters on Barton Springs Road; and the time frame used to project future costs, which included several months at the peak of the COVID pandemic (when the utility suspended late fees as a relief measure) as well as Winter Storm Uri. "If they come down closer to our number," says Coffman, "a lot of these other issues become easier, because there's less money you have to charge the people."

In a Council public hearing Nov. 15, AE rebutted those issues point by point. The hearing examiner sided with AE on many of these justifications, but notably rejected the use of 2021 as the "test year" for determining the revenue requirement, saying that AE "better explain Winter Storm Uri's impact." Council Member Kathie Tovo agreed, saying she was "compelled by interveners' testimony ... it did seem to me that revenue on most years is higher." Austin Energy counsel Thomas Brocato said the utility has already adjusted for Uri's impact.

USE LESS, STILL PAY MORE?

A different issue is the compression of AE's rate structure from five tiers to three, which the IHE didn't weigh in on except to express concern about rate shock for those not enrolled in AE's Customer Assistance Program, which provides bill relief to (some. but not all) low-income customers, and to "recommend that AE either revisit its current rate design or consider a targeted assistance program like CAP, perhaps to be phased out over time."

Coffman points out that AE was an early adopter of a progressive rate design that incentivized conservation and that the

proposed change is "going to result in some really big winners and some really big losers. I don't think that the losers are aware of what is at risk. There's some people that are going to get a 30% or more increase in their bill. It's going to be low-income people, people who live alone, people who live in apartments." Coffman's counterproposal is for four tiers: "We're trying to move rates in the direction that Austin Energy wants to move them, but just not as radically and not as much at one time.

"I think there's general consensus that the current rate design has led to people in Austin using less," says Coffman. "That's why Austin Energy is so concerned, is that they do see their energy use dropping over time. The disappointing thing is that their answer is to stop encouraging energy efficiency and conservation so much."

Aside from large customers like NXP Semiconductors, which are balking at increased energy costs, stakeholder pushback to the rate proposal has come in two flavors: socioeconomic and environmental. Many agree with Coffman that the proposal shifts too much of AE's cost burden onto its low-income customers. They also feel the new rate structure flies in the face of AE's 2020 Resource, Generation, and Climate Protection Plan for divesting from coal by 2035, which is supposed to "serve as a model for others in achieving immediate, large-scale environmental benefits and reducing emissions, while maintaining affordable electricity rates."

Texas Climate Jobs Action Fund held a joint rally Sept. 24 at AE's new headquarters at Mueller with local labor unions, Sierra Club Lone Star Chapter, Sunrise Austin,

and PODER, citing both environmental and economic concerns about the rate increase and calling for greater labor protections by AE. Kaiba White with Public Citizen, one of the interveners in the case, says the proposal "is in direct conflict with all of the goals that Austin City Council has adopted, that in the past AE has even been supportive of.

"Those who are using less energy are lower-income," White continued. "Austin Energy has tried to kind of cherry-pick the data to make it seem like that's not the case. But people who have more money generally use more electricity; they have bigger houses, more appliances." AE told the Chronicle in an email that their "research shows that many low-income customers are currently subsidizing other high-income customers based on the existing rate design. Austin Energy's proposal is intended to lessen the burden on low-income customers."

Labor advocates have also called into question AE's worker protections in light of a rate increase they see burdening the working class. Power purchase agreements with wind and solar suppliers not owned by AE do not adhere to Workers Defense Project's Better Builder standards, which other city projects are required to do. TCJAF's Stephanie Corte said, "Texas construction workers face deadly working conditions, low pay, and unaffordable health care. Austin Energy is a publicly owned utility, and we must ensure public resources are used responsibly in a way that allows construction workers to get home safe every night."

Early this summer, CM Ann Kitchen worked with labor leaders to try to extend those protections to workers on solar farms

in West Texas, but Council's reaction was lukewarm and the issue was tabled. "The other perspective was, 'These are people not working in our community," explains Kitchen. "We're getting the benefits of what these workers are doing. So I don't think it's right to say we don't have to do what's fair."

Environmental advocates also take issue with how the rate proposal addresses the value to the utility of the generating capacity of customers' solar installations - the "value of solar," or "VoS" for short. Currently AE bases this number on a three-year rolling average but is proposing to change it to a flat rate based on one test year. "Instead of it being a calculation that takes into account the value provided by solar energy over the lifetime of a system, which is 25 to 30 years, at minimum, they're looking at just one year of value," says White.

"So as you can imagine, in this market, that would result in a lot more volatility. The problem with that is when an individual or business is thinking about purchasing solar, one of the key things most of them want to know is, how long will it take for it to pay off? Having a methodology that is more volatile is fundamentally a problem for increased adoption of solar, which is an established city goal." The advocates have proposed a five-year rolling average for calculating VoS and asked AE to develop a program for local distributed community solar installs, effective by October 2023.

MEETING IN THE MIDDLE

Those changes to the VoS are part of a joint proposal issued two weeks ago by the ICA and three environmental groups (Sierra Club, Solar United Neighbors, and Public Citizen) as a compromise. This plan offers AE a \$12 million revenue requirement and increases the base rate to \$12 (a 20% increase as opposed to the original 150%). It revises the rate structure to four tiers, following the ICA's recommendation, and directs the utility to reopen its Resource, Generation, and Climate Protection Plan in light of possible federal funding that may be coming next year. "It's still a rate increase, just much lower," says Lone Star Sierra Club Conservation Director Cyrus Reed.

The document points out "the impending environmental compliance costs associated with the continued operation of [Fayette Power Project coal] plant" - which AE failed to divest as planned after a snag in negotiations with their co-owner, the Lower Colorado River Authority. So, the compromise suggests AE conduct a comprehensive update to the Resource Plan and come up with a new timeline for Fayette's retirement.

"There is a lot of money in the Inflation Reduction Act that is available for

communities that are looking to get out of coal, and particularly to buy down debt," says Reed. "So there is potential that some of that money could be used in a negotiated settlement with LCRA."

The city Electric Utility Commission, which has expressed serious doubts about AE's plan, met Monday, Nov. 14, to finalize the recommendation it made to Council the following day. After impassioned testimony from large AE customers against the changes: interveners like Sierra Club and Coalition for Clean, Affordable, and Reliable Energy (CCARE, which also advocates for major customers); and private citizens, EUC Chair Marty Hopkins presented EUC's recommendations. "Though we tried to reach unanimous consensus we were unable to do so," said Hopkins, so two resolutions ensued: one unanimous, one 6-3.

The unanimous resolution recommends either five or four tiers, limits the base rate increase to 20% or \$2, and requests expansion of the Customer Assistance Program. The 6-3 vote would cap AE's revenue requirement at \$15 million and adopt the ICA's rate design with four tiers. Recommendations also include hiring a third party to update AE's 2015 non-nuclear decommissioning study and incentivizing community solar adoption. Hopkins said most EUC disagreement centered around the revenue requirement cap - she herself agreed with the IHE's \$31 million figure.

automatically enrolling those who benefit from school free lunch programs, to better align CAP with the low-income population.

Austin Energy told the Chronicle in an email, "It is important to remember that the Customer Charge is waived for CAP customers, meaning they would not pay the proposed \$25 charge regardless of their usage."

"There's some people that are going to get a 30% or more increase in their bill. It's going to be low income people, people who live alone, people who live in apartments."

CM Leslie Pool said, "I'm uncomfortable simply taking a midpoint [number] when I'm sure there's a reason why AE has pegged the requirement at \$35.7 million. We have to be able to trust that number." Council members agreed that the case hinges on, as Mayor Pro Tem Alison Alter put it, a "really crisp summary of the elements of the \$35.7 million you're asking for." After AE's detailed rebuttal to the ICA proposal, Kitchen called for a clear comparison of the AE, ICA, and IHE recommendations to be posted online; that can be found at bit.lv/3Eh8aNJ.

As for expanding the Customer Assistance Program, AE's Kerry Overton outlined that of the service area's 450,000 customers, 93,000 are discount-eligible but only 35,000 participate in the CAP. The utility plans to extend the program to as many as 60,000 participants over the next two years by expanding name-matching software and CM Pool recommended the expansion to help with rate shock, saying, "It doesn't look like there's a scenario where we won't have to raise rates a little bit, and likely by a lot."

"AE believes that this is the time to make a dramatic change toward exactly where they want to be," Coffman told the Chronicle. "My theory of ratemaking is that you need to look at the data, and you move in [that] direction. But you need to also apply other public policy concerns, like the policy of encouraging energy efficiency and not dramatically impacting low users."

Both the EUC and Council are seeking to avoid all-at-once rate shock. CM Pool suggested a three-vear implementation of the base rate increase and asked if a gradual approach to the revenue requirement is sustainable. Environmental and consumer advocate Paul Robbins, an intervener in the case, suggested doing a smaller rate increase now and then coming back before the normal five-year base rate check-in to see if a larger one is needed.

CM Tovo agreed: "Because of the dispute about revenue requirement and test year ... [maybe] do something less drastic and then come back in a few years." Robbins, along with many interveners in the rate case, suggested postponing the Dec. 1 vote until a settlement is reached with AE. CCARE's Trey Salinas said, "If that means it takes an extra week, it takes an extra week."

Salinas continued that "you [Council] are the Public Utility Commission in this situation," referring to the state agency that hears rate cases from investor-owned utilities. "It is very common practice for PUC commissioners to take [only] parts of what the IHE recommends ... Just wanna remind you of that."

AE told the Chronicle, "Typically revenues from rates cover costs ... such as employees and equipment. However, we've been using our cash reserves to cover the rising costs for a few years. We're at a point now where we need to raise rates to put us back on stable financial footing." Coffman told Council the ICA's recommendations are "enough to give the utility what it needs. If you go higher, you will spur inflation in the city. We continue to believe \$35 million is more than the PUC would offer ... the truth is somewhere between \$6 million and \$35 million."

Sierra Club's Dave Cortez ended the public testimony Nov. 15 with a warning to Council: "You have a tremendous responsibility to be accountable to us, to hold the utility accountable to the people of Austin. Folks are hurting - you know this - and you have the chance right now to hold [AE] to a standard that will help keep people in this city."

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

Can you find a hamiltonian cycle in this dodecahedron?





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



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REVIEW: DIFFERENT STAGES THEATRE'S WATER BY THE SPOONFUL

A TEASPOON OF GRAVITAS, TABLESPOON OF HEART IS THE PERFECT RECIPE FOR THIS PULITZER WINNER BY BOB ABELMAN

Different Stages Theatre's

Water by the Spoonful

The thing that immediately grabs your attention during Different Stages' moving production of Quiara Alegría Hudes' Water by the Spoonful - that is, after you rebound from the realization that the play won the 2012 Pulitzer Prize for Drama – is its musicality. Trained as a composer and known for penning the book that drives the Tony Award-winning musical In the Heights, Hudes' words resonate like lyrics, scenes seamlessly shift in pitch and rhythm, and the script calls for the dissonant cords of the late jazz great

John Coltrane to play in the background, serving as a metaphor for the tousled lives of the people who populate this play.

Water by the Spoonful is the second installment of Hudes' Elliot trilogy (preceded by Elliot, A Soldier's Fugue and

followed by The Happiest Song Plays Last) and begins with the death of the much-beloved matriarch, Ginny. It then traces its effect on those she left behind: her nephew Elliot, an emotionally and physically wounded Iraq War veteran (Jonathan Castillo) who Ginny raised since childhood: her daughter, Yazmin (Alejandra Bucio), who is an adjunct music professor; and her sister Odessa (Tonie Knight), a former crack addict and Elliot's estranged biological mother.

Odessa runs an online support group for recovering addicts, where she uses the handle Haikumom and dispenses tough love in 17 syllables to a core of fellow travelers who go by the usernames Orangutan (Annie Kim Hedrick), Chutes&Ladders (Stan McDowell), and Fountainhead (Beau Paul). This is a play about regret, relapse, and restitution. And it is about families - the ones we make and the ones we are born into.

Director Brogan Lozano finds the heart and humor in this story while reverently maintaining the gravitas it requires. And his actors brilliantly capture their characters' respective forms of fragility and prove to be particularly adept at delivering the Pulitzer Prizeworthy poetry found in the script. Yaz's "I want to grab the sky and smash it into pieces," Orangutan's "I'm a baby in a basket on an endless river," and Haikumom's tender, well-intended bumper-sticker wisdom could easily come across as schmaltzy pablum in lesser hands. On opening night, Castillo's

> effort to find the right level of intensity in his depiction of the complicated Elliot was still a work in progress.

> While this play needs little embellishment, Gary Thornsberry's fallow, no-frills scenic design in the Vortex's

black box theatre space and Amy Lewis' often late-arriving dramatic lighting do little to complement the performances, though the three-tier spacing of the chat room members nicely frames the action. Except for Nikki Zook's costuming and the rings and dings that constitute much of Jeff Miller's sound design, little creativity or craft went into establishing a sense of time and place in this production or creating an ethereal appearance for the Iraqi ghost (Michael Costilla) that haunts Elliot's waking hours. While the design elements are disappointing, they are not a deal breaker given this play and these performances.

Water by the Spoonful unfolds like its title implies - one measured drop after another. It is only after these drops accumulate that we come to understand the true meaning of the title and fully appreciate what appears in the script and on the stage.

Wanted: Artists for Travis County Project

NEW INSTALLATION PART OF SEXUAL ASSAULT SURVIVORS' SETTLEMENT

Travis County is looking for artists to create possibly one of the area's most important works of public art in recent years.

In 2021, the Travis County Commissioners Court voted to settle a major lawsuit with sexual assault survivors over the county's history of systemic mishandling of their cases. In addition to reforms, the agreement also called for the creation of a memorial space or installation to give a concrete presence for survivors and victims of sexual assault. Travis County District Attorney José Garza said, "We are committed to supporting the creation of an art piece that will represent the courage and determination of sexual assault victims who fought for those reforms."

Now the county has opened the bidding process to create that environment, to be located at the Ronald Earle Building (416 W. 11th), and is asking artists to enter their proposals. There will be a pre-bid walk-through of the designated space at 10am, Nov. 30, and then artists will have until Jan. 4, 2023, to submit their original proposals (artists who have been personally impacted by sexual violence are particularly invited to apply). The proposals will then go to an evaluation committee comprising county staff, sexual assault survivors, and community advocates. The selected work will be completed at a collaborative event with survivors and members of the community. D.A.'s Office Director of the Special Victims Unit Erin Martinson said, "My hope is that this piece will serve as a permanent visual reminder of the harm that occurs in our community and an inspiration for Austinites to invest in addressing sexual violence." - Richard Whittaker

The Shady Llama Beer & Wine Garden radiates a laid-back Hill **Country** vibe over everyone who plops down at a picnic table or in an Adirondack chair with a glass of beer or wine under the oak trees to watch the sun set into the Wimberley Valley below.

"The kids come to see the llamas, the parents come for the beer," says Karalisa Sellers. Both big fans of Texas craft beers, she and her husband, Lamar, opened the bar in 2018.

Six **llamas** came with the property they purchased in 2015, 5 miles north of Wimberley and 10 miles south of **Dripping Springs**. They adopted a female llama last year who came with a spring surprise: On Halloween, the herd's ninth member, Witbier, was born.


It's nice of the couple to provide us with a place in the country to relax with friends and a local craft beer or Texas wine. Two food trucks complete the trifecta of a chill vibe.

The elephant at the Ilama farm is the taproom's smallish parking lot. "No parking" signs along the narrow and winding Ranch Road 12 are strictly enforced. Karalisa says the parking lot is constrained by the terrain, plus it tends to limit the crowds to a comfortable size. If the parking lot is full, she encourages day trippers to patronize one of the many other establishments in the Wimberley area. Qatar and FIFA (and Soccer)

Qatar's last-minute decision to ban the previously agreed upon **beer sales** at stadiums was followed by FIFA boss **Gianni Infantino**'s bizarre rant defending the hosts, and inviting critics to blame him instead. Okay, he has a point: FIFA sucks also. For another example, it was they, not directly Qatar, who nixed a plan this week for several European teams to wear **rainbow armbands** to support gay rights (rights that do not exist in Qatar). So yes, FIFA is a worthy target – watch *FIFA Uncovered* on Netflix for more on that – and thanks for reminding us.

But soccer fans have a long history of not letting FIFA spoil their own party. Sure, there's corruption, and for some reason they've dragged everyone out into the desert in the winter, and there's so much more to talk about, but while we've got all the players here, *let's just play the damn game*. And thankfully that started on Sunday.

The Story So Far

Four of the eight groups have played their first games as we go to press, and there's been one massive surprise so far. In these parts the big news is the **U.S.** letting **Wales** off the hook and settling for a 1-1 draw after seeming the better side for much of the game. **England**'s 6-2 waxing of **Iran** was

surprising only in how very good England looked, and how shell-shocked Iran looked. Perhaps the political situation in Iran had something to do with that; the team all declined to sing the national anthem, which seemed pointed, and was likely noticed back home. **Qatar**, the current Asian champion, was equally at sea in a 2-0 loss to **Ecuador** that could've been much worse. Plus a good number of their fans left at halftime. **Holland**'s 2-0 win over **Senegal** was a

different matter, and might have gone either way until a pair of late goals sealed it.

Then came Tuesday, when the first game saw what BetMGM calls the biggest World Cup upset in history, as unfancied **Saudi Arabia** came from behind to shock **Argentina**, who was riding a 36-game unbeaten streak and a lot of expectations in **Leo Messi**'s fifth and almost surely final World Cup. The blancoceleste are still okay, but they may need to win out against Mexico and Poland to advance. Those two played to a scoreless draw, as did **Denmark** and **Tunisia** in Group D, with **France** shrugging off an early Aussie goal to cruise, 4-1, in a style befitting a defending champion.

What's Next

We'll see four games a day for the rest of the group stage, with Groups E and F playing Wednesday, G and H getting underway on Thanksgiving Day, and then starting with everyone's second games this Friday. Here's the dayby-day outlook.

Wednesday: On paper, this looks like an easy day for the favorites – in this case the four European teams, who are all very good. But watch out for Japan, a dark horse in a very tough group. I'll root for our neighbors, Canada and Costa Rica, but it could be a tough day for them against Spain and Belgium, respectively.

Thursday: We get our first look at Brazil, the overall favorite, and the enigma that is Group H, where anything could happen. Ghana has ruined the U.S. at multiple WCs; they could do the same to Cristiano Ronaldo and Portugal.

Friday: The plot thickens as teams start playing their second games. The U.S. will try to slow a potent British attack, and avoid becoming a Black Friday joke. Fun fact: England has never beaten the U.S. in the World Cup. Based on the firstgame results, goal differential may be decisive in this group; if Wales can run up the score on Iran, they'll force the U.S. to do the same in the finale. Over in Group A, we'll see if Ecuador is for real, and whether Qatar becomes the first team eliminated from the tournament.

Saturday: Argentina-Mexico was always going to be an entertaining game, but now it's almost a must-win for Argentina. It would be sad for Messi to go out this early; check out the NPR podcast on him, *The Last Cup*. Saudi Arabia-Poland takes on a different flavor as well, now that the underdogs took the first bite. Denmark has already beaten France twice this year; now they'll try to three-peat on the big stage.

Sunday: Circle Spain-Germany as probably the marquee matchup of the first round. Tough matchups again for our continent-mates, in games they probably have to win.

Monday: Again, the group favorites meet in two games, while the outsiders meet in the others.

Tuesday-Friday: Starting Tuesday, each group concludes with all four teams playing simultaneously. The U.S. likely goes into this game needing a win, and maybe a big win. And watch out; that could be just what Iran needs to wake them up.

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Peeling the Layers of the *Glass Onion*

Benoit Blanc returns with a twisting, celebrity-packed island mystery by trace sauveur

Rian Johnson is a big fanboy. His clever construction never undermines the genre hallmarks of his films (he loves them too much for that), but he wouldn't be fulfilled without seeing what new areas he can push these genres into. It's the reason he made one of the only genuinely ambitious pieces of Star Wars media post-Disney buyout, and why 2019's Knives Out felt like it

was lightly tinkering with the expectations of a whodunit mystery as much as it fully embraced those archetypes. He's had great success in simultaneously subverting and celebrating the ostensible blueprint of any given film.

Glass Onion: A Knives Out Mystery is yet another pure distillation of the Johnson formula. In the continuing escapades of world-renowned detective Benoit Blanc (a

perfect, hilarious Craig), it trades in the cozy, sweater-weather, New England country house setting of its predecessor for a full-blown vacation-style destination murder mystery, set on the sunny shores of a Greek island. It's completely stand-alone - you could tune in and not miss a beat if you skipped the first movie. If it isn't immediately obvious, the Agatha Christie worship is on full display. Johnson's clear

reverence for the serialized detective fiction genre is striking, and his indulgence is a joyous amount of fun when it's this cleverly assembled.

The film introduces us to our potential suspects first: a disparate group of friends including floundering politician Claire (Hahn), washedup pop star Birdie Jay (Hudson), scientist Lionel (Odom Jr.), and men's rights Twitch streamer

> Duke (Bautista). Though none seem particularly prone to following lockdown regulations anyway (the film is set in 2020), all are thrilled when they receive an elaborate puzzle box from their mysterious billionaire friend Miles (Norton) that, when opened, invites them all out to his private island for a weekend of food, relaxation, and a planned murder mystery game. All are shocked when not only Blanc arrives but so does Andi

(Monáe), an enigmatic piece of the puzzle who clearly does not fit with the rest of the guests. Of course, the weekend does not go as planned, and Blanc grows suspicious of the ensemble and the true reason for this get-together.

If you've seen the first film, you know that Johnson is an impressive architect when it comes to structuring the twisty roller coaster of red herrings and story reveals something

like this requires. It meanders for a while at the start, taking about a full hour to get to the central mystery, then cleverly recontextualizes everything with an ambitious swerve in the plotting that almost entirely switches what story you thought you were watching. It's bold and pays off; even if you think you know who's behind it all, the crafty way information is doled out ensures you would never know how or why.

Though this franchise revels in the tropes of classic whodunits, both films are distinct contemporary products of their social, political. and social climate. Knives Out suffered some defects of the incessantly logged-on social media age, and though Glass Onion isn't necessarily more subtle, it incorporates its commentary into the story with greater care. Norton is great to see back in a major role, and his megarich dummy techbro character feels less reminiscent of Elon Musk and more of a straight caricature, in a story reflecting the absurdity of society when it's so heavily influenced by such a bonehead.

It's blunt but not grating, a result of Johnson's deft touch as a filmmaker. He toes a line of getting too gratuitous, with maybe one too many celebrity cameos, but there's an infectious quality to the worlds he builds onscreen. It's a shame most people will see this film on Netflix when it's primed for the communal experience of an audience, but any way for these films to be financed and released is a net positive. There's one more confirmed outing for Blanc, but I would take as many of these as possible if they are all this much fun.

DEVOTION

It would be all too easy to compare Devotion to Top Gun: Maverick. As the second fighter pilot drama to star Glen Powell released this year, it's not unfair to say that it lives in the shadow of the Tom Cruise-starring box-office behemoth, especially given that Maverick is overall a more robust film and having to stand up to its pedigree after the fact is unfeasible. But a direct comparison between the two films also feels disingenuous to the objectives of Devotion's story, and the fact that this takes on a different tone of aviator heroism. It's defined by a more sober type of restraint rather than bravura pop bombast.

That's due in no small part to the tender true story at the heart of the picture. Based on Adam Makos' 2014 book Devotion: An Epic Story of Heroism, Friendship, and Sacrifice, it follows the friendship between naval pilots Jesse Brown (Majors) and Tom Hudner (Powell) in the midst of the Korean War. But maybe what the film is more prominently about is Brown being the first Black aviator to complete the Navy's basic flight training and ends up the only Black man in his squadron, perpetually ostracized and constantly degraded, abased, and infantilized. As the new recruit, Hudner has joined the fleet in search of some type of meaning, and soon he and Brown form a delicate, sometimes taut relationship with each other, as well as the rest of the flybovs (with supporting performers including Jonas and Cross).

If you happen to know the story of Brown and Hudner then you know to expect a bit of an emotional journey. Devotion is nothing if not indebted to a litany of preceding war films that act as an assessment of loyalty and friendship in the face of destructive violence, and the gut punch of the real events ensures that the film packs the same emotional wallop as many of its precursors. It's committed to the hallmarks of the genre, for better and for worse. Though undeniably sincere and crafted with a sturdy visual sense from cinematographer Erik Messerschmidt, there's as much rote storytelling here as there is surprisingly thoughtful character work. The script by Jake Crane and Jonathan Stewart does little to deviate from the true events, which is admirable in some respects and awkward in others. A detour in which the pilots dock at Cannes and go to a party with Elizabeth Taylor seems to mostly be true, but acts as a somewhat questionable digression within the greater scope of the film.

The whole thing is carried, of course, by its two leads. Powell is effective as Hudner but mostly acts as a functional foil to Majors, who's in this to steal the show. His portrayal of Brown is tactful and moving, with so much subtle internal love and anger expressed so effortlessly.



Brown is a man who just wants to make it home to his wife, Daisy (Jackson), and daughter every day, but he also knows he's meant to be in the sky, despite how often he's told that he can't do it. He and Hudner form an interesting contrast, with the latter's by-the-book sensibilities at odds with the lived experience of a man who has learned the necessity of breaking the rules that seek to subjugate him. Their dynamic helps to lift a film that can otherwise be stiflingly prosaic. Though, if nothing else, its Thanksgiving release makes it an inoffensive respite with the family while at home for a couple of days. The parents will love it and weep.

Steven Spielberg, arguably the most popular and commercially successful film storyteller of all time, delves into his personal history for story material in The Fabelmans. No sharks, no extraterrestrials, no Nazis, pirates, or dinosaurs this time as narrative antagonists; here, Spielberg looks to his past and his early family life in what might be considered an authorized biography. Spielberg's "Portrait of the Filmmaker as a Young Artist" is his most personal work, and as such it marks an atypical storytelling approach for the moviemaker. Yet, in going personal, Spielberg has lost none of his popular appeal (the film won the People's Choice Award at the Toronto International Film Festival. usually a harbinger of future accolades). While the film provides many invaluable insights into Spielberg's technical and thematic tropes that

can be seen repeated throughout his career, the filmmaker also burnishes aspects of his life story and leaves out chunks of years to create what is inevitably a self-indulgent yet delightful origin story, appropriately called The Fabelmans.

Almost as much as the film tells the backstory of how the filmmaker discovered his vocation and learned his chops, The Fabelmans is also the story of Spielberg's parents and their dichotomous approaches to life. As Mitzi and Burt Fabelman, Michelle Williams and Paul Dano deliver brilliant performances (as does the rest of the well-chosen cast), he the genius scientist who would prefer that his son, Sammy (played by LaBelle in a careermaking performance and by Francis-DeFord as a young child), made useful

Touching From a Distance in There There

ANDREW BUJALSKI MAKES CONNECTIONS IN HIS PANDEMIC-CRAFTED EXPERIMENTAL DRAMA BY RICHARD WHITTAKER

The pandemic isn't over, but everyone's finding new ways to live through it. Take Austin filmmaker Andrew Bujalski. "I'm starting to be a bit more cavalier," he said. "I was just walking around a coffee shop with no mask."

There haven't been many films about the pandemic - a subject that has seemingly made filmmakers squeamish. Yet even within that small catalog There There, the latest movie from Bujalski (Computer Chess, Support the Girls). stands out. Most others, like British horror Host or Peter Hedges' La Ronde-esque ensemble piece The Same Storm, explore how people found proxy connections through technology, through Zoom and FaceTime. In *There There* the characters are never onscreen together, and the audience must discern how they are sharing a space - virtually, or socially distanced across a coffee table or restaurant bar. The real secret is that there was no point in production where the actors were in the same space - or even the same city. "The chemistry is all movie magic," said Bujalski.

He described the Tribeca Film Festival-selected There There as "a screenplay that was devised for a very specific method of working." About three months into lockdown, film production became one of the first industries to come back, due to the use of heavily regulated bubbles on set. Bigbudget movies are already pretty segregated on set, Bujalski noted, "and Hollywood just went, 'Let's throw another \$10 [million] or \$20 million and we're good to go." But, he added. "because I'm a lunatic" he started to think about the underlying concepts of cinema, and one idea stuck in his head. "Every time you edit, there's a lie that tells the truth. Maybe one actor who is gazing lovingly into another person's eyes, that actor went home hours ago. ... Can I take the natural dissonances there and really pull them apart? Just like taking a piece of taffy and

vanking it apart, so I'm making a much greater disconnection by literally isolating everybody."

Bujalski assembled a star-laden cast, including Lennie James, Lili Taylor, and Jason Schwartzman - but assembled is the wrong word. Each cast member recorded their half of their scenes in a state of splendid isolation, from wherever they were using an equipment package shipped to them in a padded Pelican case. There would be one technician in the room, and usually another actor reading the other character's lines ("We call them 'phantom cast'"), but everyone else -Bujalski, his longtime director of photography Matthias Grunsky, and the rest of the production team - were on Zoom. "It certainly wasn't conventional," the director said. "It was like eight microshoots. We'd do one performer at a time, figure out everything we needed to figure out for that person, and usually be in some phase of prep for the next person, whenever that was coming up."

From a technical point of view, There There was a completely fresh challenge for Bujalski, and he ended up with 80 hours of footage of raw performance ("by far the most I've ever had") to craft into a film by melding these disconnected monologues into dialogues. "It's a testament to what actors do," He said. "When I'm watching Lili Taylor and Lennie James in that first scene, it's like I'm watching Lili imagining Lennie, and then I can cut to her imagination."

So while There There was definitely born of the pandemic. Bujalski rejects the idea that it's about the pandemic, but instead about "strained intimacies. ... About the feeling you can have at any time of standing in a room with somebody and wondering if you're in the same place at all."

and tangible things rather than imaginary film stories and entertainments, and she a proponent for the arts and following your heart's desires.

The couple is a fascinating pair and sometimes their story threatens to overwhelm the young filmmaker's story. It's as if Spielberg were still trying to explain it all to himself, especially now with the distance of them both being deceased and the perspective of his own parenthood to guide him.

In crafting The Fabelmans, Spielberg harnessed several of his frequent collaborators: co-scriptwriter Tony Kushner, cinematographer Janusz Kamiński, editors Sarah Broshar and Michael Kahn, and composer John Williams - all of whom add their signature polish to this most personal Spielberg delectation. Notably, Sammy's experiences as a victim of antisemitism also make up a significant portion of the drama, a facet of the story that has become culturally topical again.

In an impactful sequence, a visiting uncle (Hirsch) who had run away with the circus warns Sammy that they are both kindred souls who are "meshuga for art," but that this characteristic would always come into conflict with family demands. It seems that with the valorization of his parents in The Fabelmans, Spielberg is trying to finally reconcile his two loves. Spoiler alert (although not if you've seen more than a few Spielberg films): Young Sammy and grownup Steven both find happy endings.

FREE CHOL SOO LEE

D: Julie Ha. Eugene Yi. (PG-13. 83 min.)

"Whatever I was on the outside does not justify to frame a person to put him in prison for a murder he did not commit." These words from Chol Soo Lee seem like a pretty simple truism, one that should be a cornerstone of justice. However, as documentary Free Chol Soo Lee shows, it's wisdom that seems to evade what are supposed to be the mechanisms of that justice.

His case is alarmingly simple. In 1974, Lee was convicted of what press at the time called the execution-style murder of Yip Yee Tak, targeted by his own gang for ripping them off for \$10,000. Multiple eyewitnesses ID'd the 21-year-old, and he seemed like the kind of kid who would get into this kind of trouble: A Korean migrant in San Francisco's Chinatown, an outsider in the community, picking up work as a strip joint barker, he was already on probation for theft.

There's supposedly a feel-good end to this story. In 1982, after a public pressure campaign. Lee received a retrial and was found not guilty. But that wasn't the end. Lee's life had been ruined, and by the time of his release he had actual blood on his hands, a killing that only happened because he was in jail. Once Lee was released, his life fell apart - or rather, it continued on the track that it had been set on before he was wrongfully convicted.

Free Chol Soo Lee is only partially the story of an injustice overturned. It's also the story of a movement, as Korean American communities rallied around his cause. But that's where firsttime documentarians Julie Ha and Eugene Yi pull back the camera for a broader perspective, not just on Lee's story, but on the marginalization of the Asian community at every level - and indeed the danger of that very term, "Asian community," because him being one of the few Korean people in that neighborhood was a factor in both his conviction and his position as an outsider on the streets where he lived. At the same time, it's how he found a champion in K.W. Lee, the wry, foulmouthed, no-nonsense, award-winning reporter with The Sacramento Union, a Korean American reporter who himself felt like the odd man out.

But Free Chol Soo Lee isn't a simple story of overcoming injustice. Lee was a victim - not the devil but, by his own admission, no angel - and his post-prison life was a spiraling mess, one that left the community that had fought for him feeling completely betrayed.

Ha and Yi do not shy away from the messiness of the case and the complexities of Lee as a man. Through archive footage, contemporary interviews, elegantly framed reenactments in black-and-white still photography, and narration from Lee's own memoirs (recited by Sebastian Yoon, himself incarcerated at age 16 and prematurely written off by society), it deliberately and pointedly asks far more questions than it can ever answer: questions it quietly implores the audience to take home: to debate: to take to the ballot box and the courtroom, to discussions about social services and rehabilitation and policing of minority communities; to take on board next time someone starts mythologizing complicated figures.

And Lee's liberation still leaves one unanswered question, one left open for future filmmakers that probably still plagues his family to this day: Who did kill Yip Yee Tak? Because the injustice of a wrongful conviction is also the injustice of an unsolved murder.

THE INSPECTION

D: Elegance Bratton; with Jeremy Pope, Gabrielle Union, Bokeem Woodbine, Raúl Castillo, McCaul Lombardi, Eman Esfandi. (R, 95 min.)

Military dramas tend to be either blithely and blindly jingoistic or aggressive indictments of the very concept of war. *The Inspection* is closer to something like *A Few Good Men*: an internalized debate about the experience of being within a regulated, regimented culture.

Drawing on writer/director Elegance Bratton's own experiences as a queer Black man in the Marines, The Inspection boards the bus to boot camp with Ellis (Pope), a 26-yearold who sees the Marine Corps as his last chance at a life. A tragic future is augured for him by a fellow resident of the shelter in which he's spent parts of the last decade, who warns him, one Black queer to another, to never come back. Ellis' sole stop on the way to the sweaty South is to see his mom (a cantankerous, tough-love Union, her heart filled with faith and venom), whose approval is all he seeks. The path he sees to that reunion goes through basic training, and *The Inspection* goes through every grueling, degrading moment of the process.

There's method to the dehumanization going on, especially when it comes to how everyone in the barracks handles knowing that Ellis is gay, even if he never admits to or discusses it. Physical assaults, both sanctioned and ignored by his commanding officers, are part of the regimen, with nothing to be done except ignore them. This is an isolated world, and *Minari* cinematographer Lachlan Milne works with Bratton to create an environment that can switch from mud-soaked brutality to breeze-block tedium, one that feels like it lasts to the horizon while still being constantly claustrophobic.

Some elements may seem familiar, with the conflict between the savagery of drill sergeant Laws (a scorched-earth performance from Woodbine) and the more compassionate Rosales (Castillo) echoing the gunfire between Tom Berenger and Willem Dafoe in Platoon. But then, that film was based on Oliver Stone's own experiences, and maybe these are just the roles that people fall into as part of the necessity of the process. Bratton isn't interested in taking positions about the right or wrong of the military mindset, but more in asking questions of passing and acceptance. In The Inspection, "don't ask, don't tell" is a way to weed out recruits, but once they're in place it becomes a protective code of silence. The bunk room gets emptier, washouts simply disappearing rather than being given some big emotional send-off speech, their absence denoting the survival of those left. Does Laws abuse Ellis, curse him. throw homophobic slurs because he wants him out or because that's the weak spot that he can probe? Is it different than calling a recruit fat or stupid, or throwing racial and religious epithets at the troupe's sole Muslim, Ismail (Esfandi)? Is Ellis valiant for enduring, or for rebelling?



Bratton isn't providing answers, but instead testing our own responses: Indeed, there's arguably more of Laws than Rosales in his own storytelling technique. Only when *The Inspection* is complete does it truly reveal itself: a powerful, poignant, and complicated look at what people will do for acceptance.

STRANGE WORLD

D: Don Hall, Qui Nguyen; with Jake Gyllenhaal, Dennis Quaid, Jaboukie Young-White, Gabrielle Union, Lucy Liu. (PG, 102 min.)

Imagine living in a world where the energy resource upon which you have depended is running out – fast.

In its core environmental metaphor, Strange World (Disney's 61st animated feature) is surprisingly subtle, because the inevitable fossil fuel crisis of our world is focused through a more sustainable source. The fantastical, mountain-surrounded realm of Avalonia runs on electricity generated from the fruit of a peculiar plant called Pando, discovered by young Searcher Clade (voiced by Gyllenhaal but looking for all the world like John Krasinski), the son of the great adventurer Jaeger Clade (Quaid). On the fateful expedition on which the plant was first harvested, Searcher rejected his father's set course for him - to follow, literally and metaphorically, in his derring-do footsteps - and turned back around, plant in hand, to become a farmer. Jaeger, meanwhile, disappeared into the snowy peaks surrounding Avalonia. Two-and-a-half decades later, with the Pando crop dying on the vine, a begrudging Searcher sets off to find a cure, with his own son, Ethan (Young-White), in tow - Ethan, who proves that apples may fall from paternal trees, but they can roll back toward their absent daredevil grandpa's mighty boughs.

While Disney is synonymous with princesses, there's been a substrand of its animated films that look tenderly at the complexities of male

relationships, and director Don Hall had writing credits on two of the best – the beloved *Tarzan* and the sadly underestimated *Brother Bear*. In the script for *Strange World* from co-director and *Raya* and the Last *Dragon* writer Qui Nguyen, the core motivator is not really the environmental crisis, or even that Searcher and team crash into a hollow earth filled with bizarre, wonderful, and peculiar creatures. It's that when Searcher and Ethan meet grandpa, who has been roaming this interior realm since that fateful parting of the ways, the story charmingly explores the complex ways that fathers and sons can be so alike and so different.

What Strange World has that has been missing from so many recent Disney animated features (yes, we're looking at you, Lightyear) is a sense of wonder. It's spectacular, and yet somehow adorable and entrancing, in a way that will keep kids as engaged as tripaw mutt Legend and Splat, the Clades' gooey guide. In the fluidity, transparency, and flowing lines of the creatures and landscapes of the inner world there's something of the work of Mary Blair, the legendary pen behind behind the enchanting concept designs for Alice in Wonderland and the "It's a Small World" ride. It's also a film that takes the visual language of the seemingly moribund genre of 1930s pulp adventure, its fonts and screen wipes, but abandons the regressive politics that seemed inherent.

Strange World continues Disney's recent trend of replacing a "good versus evil" narrative with a script built around solving a conundrum (there's even a fourth-wall-buster of a joke about the studio's lack of villains in recent movies). That approach is embodied in Jaeger: The idea of a burly adventurer conquering the wilderness would seem to put him in the same tradition of treacherous macho men as Beauty and the Beast's Gaston or great white hunter Clayton from Tarzan. It's hard to imagine either of them giving their grandson advice about their first gay crush, but then, Strange World isn't afraid of taking on a rich mix of narrative strands: After all, how do

intergenerational relationships fit together with an eco-crisis? The answer is very Disney in the best ways, and a rewarding continuation of the studio's recent narrative fascination with overcoming divides rather than evil.

THERE THERE

Filmmaking during the pandemic, or more specifically, the lockdown during the pandemic, introduced a fair amount of logistical restrictions. The guarantine made traditional production all but impossible, so new modes emerged. Call it accidental Dogme 95. Actors framed in a laptop video chat amid domestic spaces of natural light, often alone (or with cats), broken up by some frenetic cellphone tracking shots and varying degrees of audio quality, performing with other actors, also alone (or with dogs). And while There There, the latest from Andrew Bujalski (Computer Chess, Results) - a filmmaker whose name will forever be associated with "Austin resident," but also with mumblecore - was shot during the height of the lockdown, a large part of its charm is due to the way the film slyly subverts those conditions.

Take the opening vignette, for instance (for this is a film of vignettes, another distinguishing pandemic trait): A couple, played by Lennie James and Lili Taylor, engages in some morning pillow talk after hooking up the night before. Never sharing the frame, or the same wall color, is the giveaway, but Bujalski has removed the laptop, has excised that technology almost entirely from the film. It's a clever conceit, one that keeps the film nimble when some of the episodes wander off, thematically speaking. After the couple parts ways on a downbeat, Taylor meets up with her Alcoholics Anonymous sponsor (LaGanga) at a coffee shop. LaGanga then takes a tense meeting with her son's beleaguered school teacher (Gordon), and then the baton is passed to Jason Schwartzman, a lawver in the midst of ethical soul-searching, before the relay returns to James, now working in the restaurant he owns. Bujalski's characters never explicitly mention the pandemic, only making oblique references to a changed world, but everyone is dealing with conflict, weariness, anger, and uncertainty. There There skews its world ever so slightly, arriving at some nicely off-kilter insights amid its non sequiturs, but for all its neat tricks, function is definitely following form here.

UKRAINE, TEXAS

Feeding the resistance with varenyky and mutual aid BY JOHN BESCHE

Tonya Levchuk would have laughed her wry, post-Soviet laugh if you asked her how much Ukrainian food she was eating in January 2022. She'd ask, with a smirk, who had the time to cook such old-world things. Like many emerging from the worst of the pandemic, Tonya was doing her best to work, work out, and eke out eight hours of sleep. Peeling vegetables for soups from her native Ukraine took a backseat to the demands, and conveniences, of suburban life.

Then Vladimir Putin launched his invasion of Ukraine on February 24. Levchuk and hundreds of other Ukrainians in Austin watched on tenterhooks as missiles battered their home country. She set up four computer monitors on her dining room table so that she could watch the news, track the destruction, and keep tabs with as many friends and relatives in Ukraine as possible. Now, Tonya and her husband, Daniel, share their home with Tonya's mother, sister, and niece who arrived from Ukraine on tourist visas and it smells of borsch.

Borsch - the reddish-purple beet-andcabbage soup commonly known by the Ashkenazi Yiddish transliteration "borscht" - has been a sixth character in Tonya Levchuk's year. From the day she retrieved her family from the Polish-Ukrainian border to now, the intangible foundations of Ukrainian culture and identity have kept her and her community going for nine months.

Levchuk understands the power of those bonds, perhaps more than most. In addition to her day job, she is the executive director of Liberty Ukraine, a local NGO dedicated to sending medical and humanitarian supplies to Ukraine while supporting the 32 Ukrainian refugee families enrolled in their support network programming in Austin. Levchuk has leaned into the unifying - and marketable - elements of culture that have served as pastoral care for the resettled families and an engine for badly needed mutual aid. So far, Levchuk has been able to move mountains

- soliciting grants from local grocery stores and arranging food-based fundraisers, among other things - to support the community and the Ukrainian army.

Levchuk and many other Austin-based Ukrainians have spoken about how food connects people and how its cultural, emotional, and physiological significance has meant the world to them in this difficult time – as is true for most displaced people everywhere. What's different about the Ukrainian diaspora is that they have a role to play from home in Putin's war. Reifying their distinct Ukrainian identity at home and in public life through food has been a practical means of survival, but it's also a riposte to Putin's efforts - in words and weapons - to assert that Ukraine never existed in the first place.

To Austin's Ukrainian community, the meaning of food on every level - spiritual, political, physical - has co-evolved in lockstep with the war itself. And it started with coffee.

KABA / KAVA - ANXIETY

"Kava" is Ukrainian for "coffee." It comes from the Arabic "qahwa" and then Ottoman Turkish "kahve." Russians say "кофе" (kof'ye), which comes from a Western source. In the wake of the war, more and more Ukrainians are shifting away from a bilingual Ukrainian/Russian society – kava is political.

For the first week of the war, Tonya Levchuk subsisted on coffee and water. She was too anxious to eat, too desperate to stay awake, too glued to the monitors to bother with solid food. On one screen, she was able to track her family's westward

progress from Kyiv to the border. She and her husband joked about how excited they'd get when they saw the blue dot inch forward by 150 meters.

"I didn't eat for five days," Levchuk said somberly, and then quipped, "it was a good fast!" She explained that even a month after her family moved in with her and her husband, "nobody cared about food." Her family was preoccupied with catching its breath and settling into safety.

Levchuk wasn't the only Ukrainian eating sparingly and sporadically during the first few weeks of the war; many other Ukrainians were in a kava-fueled state, on a mission.

Kateryna "Kate" Voinova woke up panicked, but clear-eyed, on February 24. "I was horrified because I understood that day," Voinova recalled in an interview. "I spoke to my relatives, I spoke to my friends, and I understood the day ... I was horrified because I thought if Russia comes to Kyiv and takes the government, Ukrainians will be killed. They will not suffer under Russia ... and I was afraid everyone in Ukraine would be killed. And I know I'm emphasizing, you know, but I was super emotional, and I was super frustrated. And I was thinking about Ukrainians in Austin, because I can do something only here, right?"

Voinova works with Liberty Ukraine on event planning and running a new Ukrainian language school. She frames this imperative in apocalyptic terms. "I was thinking about us as the last Ukrainians,"

Voinova said, "whose duty, whose noble duty, is to preserve Ukrainian culture, to pass it to future generations, just not to let Russia wipe it out from this planet."

Back in Kyiv, Maria Miroshnychenko - a single mother of a 13-year-old boy on the autism spectrum - heeded a mother's intuition. On February 23, Maria was a high-profile translator for the United States Agency for International Development. Her clients included heads of state, prime ministers, and the gueen of Sweden. Once the air raid sirens and explosions flooded their otherwise peaceful apartment, her son shut down. "He was just like, 'I'm not talking to you,' and that's when I was like, 'I need to get out,' because I cannot afford to lose his speech," Miroshnychenko said. "We worked really hard for him to start talking."

Just a couple days later, on day two of the war, she was sharing hotel rooms with strangers trying desperately to get her son out of harm's way. She was on "mama bear" adrenaline for days on end, with her son in tow en route to Slovakia and ultimately the United States. She is now enrolled in Liberty Ukraine's mutual aid network, which Levchuk said prioritizes single mothers, particularly single mothers of children with special needs. Now that she and her son are safely resettled in Austin and the dust has started to settle, Maria can start to think about kava, and more importantly, chai, the way she used to in Ukraine.

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

БОРШ / BORSCH -**IDENTITY**

There are many variations of borsch – not to be confused with shchi, a Russian cabbage-based soup - but at its core, borsch is all about beets and cabbage. Every family makes it a little differently and it's common to see potatoes, tomatoes, homemade bone marrow stock, tart apples, and even fish appear in borsch. One universal borsch rule of thumb: It's not done until the ladle can stand up on its own in the pot.

"Ukrainians say 'our food is borsch." Miroshnychenko noted in an interview. "It's so rich, it has so much stuff in it, and shchi, not so much. So we Ukrainians are very proud of borsch and say, 'Russians, away from our borsch, go eat your shchi!""

Shchi is a distinctly Russian food that most Ukrainians would not deign to eat much less consider their own. It's a common joke among Ukrainians that shchi is simply leftover borsch rinsed in water, devoid of flavor. The politics of borsch have played an outsized role in the story of the Ukrainian community in Austin as well as what could be interpreted as the several-hundred-years-long conflict between Russia and Ukraine. It is true that the state now known as Russia began in what is now Ukraine as the Kievan Rus' sometime in the late ninth century. East Slavic nations Belarus, Ukraine, and Russia look to medieval Kyiv as the crucible for a culture that evolved into Minsk, modern Kyiv, and Moscow. Much of Putin's bellicose rhetoric justifying his invasion of Ukraine has focused on cultural erasure. He argues that Ukraine is not a state at all, never has been, and that it and its culture are simply Russia.

Ukrainians, and the international community, did not take to this kindly. In fact, they took it to the United Nations. In July, the UN Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) inscribed "culture of Ukrainian borscht cooking" on its List of Intangible Cultural Heritage in Need of Urgent Safeguarding.

It's these essential but intangible elements of culture and identity that Kate Voinova vowed to protect at a performance of another intangible element of Ukrainian culture, its classical music tradition. Voinova stood before the crowd of the Viva Lviv benefit concert at Austin's Saengerrunde Hall earlier this month to ask, "What if we are the last Ukrainians?" The speech was punctuated by a powerful performance of Boris Lyatoshynsky's musical arrangement of Percy Bysshe Shelley's poem "Ozymandias," which, in context, is an incisive rebuke of a certain hubristic Russian president.

I met a traveller from an antique land. Who said—"Two vast and trunkless legs of stone Stand in the desert.... Near them, on the sand. Half sunk a shattered visage lies, whose frown. And wrinkled lip, and sneer of cold command. Tell that its sculptor well those passions read Which yet survive, stamped on these lifeless things, The hand that mocked them, and the heart that fed; And on the pedestal, these words appear: My name is Ozymandias, King of Kings: Look on my Works, ye Mighty, and despair! Nothing beside remains. Round the decay Of that colossal Wreck, boundless and bare The lone and level sands stretch far away."

"Once I was asked at the airport, 'Where are you from?" Voinova related. "I told them I'm from Ukraine, and they asked me, 'Is it a part of Russia?' And I was really shocked. My dream is never to be asked if Ukraine is part of Russia. This is my main intention. And I'm working 24/7 ... Since we cannot go and fight, because we are not skilled enough, we are not military people, we need to fight in this area. We need to preserve and to expand Ukrainian culture."

ВАРЕНИКИ / VARENYKY -BOREDOM

Second only to borsch in terms of Ukrainian culinary star power, varenyky are highly shareable dumplings that occupy such a significant place in the hearts of the Ukrainian diaspora, a 27-foot-tall monument to the varenyk was built in the town of Glendon, Alberta, Canada. Varenyky are half-moonshaped braided dumplings - there is usually sour cream in the dough itself - frequently filled with potatoes and farmer cheese, toppings to your discretion. Dessert varenyky recipes might call for a sour cherry compote.

Tonya Levchuk jokes that her wardrobe has shrunk since her family moved in. Her

mother, who is always on a diet, is also always making Ukrainian food. Even though her mom rarely eats what she makes, she's thrilled to spend several hours making sausage and airy breads from scratch. She used to own a bakery in Ukraine, and Tonya is quick to point out one among the many differences between Ukrainian and American food cultures: Every cake in Ukraine looks different and tastes different, every cake in America looks different and tastes the same. This is to say that Tonya's mother makes phenomenal bread and that she is bored.

Many resettled Ukrainian families waited months to convert tourist visas into Temporary Protected Status, which allows them to work and stay in the country for at least a year. Since many of Austin's Ukrainian families brought over parents and other older relatives that have retired and don't speak English, they seek comfort in the iterative process of making old-world foods, a lot.

On Facebook, some of the Ukrainian moms who have been cooking constantly have started to sell their food to other Ukrainians. The languid, varenyky-making stage of the Austin Ukrainian community's nine-month ordeal has turned into a mechanism for publicity and mutual aid. Some of Liberty Ukraine's recent fundraisers and community events have platformed refugee moms' time-honored varenyky recipes.

Levchuk says that it's comforting for people to share recipes - or conceal secret techniques - especially when it goes back into the community. Liberty Ukraine hosted a varenyky party on Sunday, Nov. 20, more or less coinciding with Thanksgiving, a holiday

that does not exist in Ukraine. Volunteer chefs gathered at Levchuk's house the weekend prior to the party to churn out dozens and dozens of the braided dumplings.

"We want especially older refugees, like moms," Levchuk said. "Because a lot of them don't drive and we want them to find friends in this community, to share their recipes because it's going to be a big topic. 'Oh, how did you make your varenyky? What's your secret?"

Despite the cold and rain, the party saw a healthy turnout in Leander, where many Ukrainians are resettled. The point, Levchuk said, was to gather the community for a mutual aid swap. Refugees and volunteers could figure out who needs what, and hopefully get their needs met. Levchuk distributed \$500 H-E-B gift cards, provided through a grant from the grocer, to 20 single Ukrainian mothers. The proceeds from the sales of the varenyky will be distributed among the refugees who prepared them.

МЕДОВИК / MEDOVIK -HOPE

Medovik is Ukraine's sour-cream-andhoney-infused answer to the mille-feuille.

For those Austinites, Ukrainian or otherwise, interested in supporting the community but unable to attend the varenyky party, there is another culinary intervention, and it's open five days a week.

Ukrainian chefs Alla Shelest and Mariana Shelestiuk opened the area's first Ukrainian restaurant, U cuisine (delivery only; order at ucuisine.us), in mid-June. "After the invasion," Shelestiuk said, "I felt a big impulse to do something. You have to do

something your way, and our way is food. Some will go to rallies, some will donate, some will write articles, this is our way to talk about Ukraine, this is our way to share what Ukraine is, how great it is, how tasty it is." Shelestiuk described the restaurant's opening – which came only three months after Putin launched his invasion of Ukraine – as a celebration, a "light in darkness" drawing families from as far away as Dallas and Houston. Now, she says, U cuisine is even drawing American regulars.

It's a point of pride for Shelestiuk and Shelest to give back to the community in material as well as cultural terms. U cuisine has hosted fundraisers where they donated a percentage of the proceeds to Liberty Ukraine. Even when there isn't a fundraiser happening, U cuisine spreads knowledge about Ukraine through little cards that they include with every meal. On the front side of a card boasting fast facts about borsch, there's the U cuisine logo, which Shelestiuk said is stylized with wheat to represent the country's role as the breadbasket of Europe - though this has been under threat as a result of the war. For to-go customers, Shelestiuk and Shelest stamp a sunflower, one of the national symbols of Ukraine, on the outside of the brown bag.


For Voinova, the legions of Ukrainian mothers and professional chefs in Austin spell hope for her community and her culture. "Russia tried to steal our borsch! Yes. Maybe three years ago, some Russian performer made this music video where he was showing borsch as a part of Russian culture," Voinova said. "So he had tacos for Mexicans and Asians with sushi rolls, and

he made borsch with Russian outfits ... this is ridiculous, right? People are fighting for soup, basically like a beet soup? What difference does it make? But when we realize Russians tried to steal borsch for centuries, it was a small victory when UNESCO confirmed that this is Ukrainian food and we need to preserve it."

Voinova noted that food is shareable and that she does not want to share the pain she has experienced due to the war, but rather her love for Ukraine. Most of the people she speaks with were not born in Kyiv. "They do not know every centimeter of my favorite city and they cannot feel my pain when Russia is shelling architecture from the 11th century. I feel that but I cannot express that. But what can I share? I can share the food made by Ukrainian women. We have awesome bakery teams. They are making pastries, they're making pies. And we have a Ukrainian restaurant here. And I'm really grateful for those people, they are baking this with love, and a little bit of sadness, of course."

Voinova is no longer as worried as she once was about being the "last Ukrainians." She points to her Ukrainian language school, the abundance of Ukrainian flags around Austin, and a willingness in the community to sing Ukrainian songs every week at the state Capitol.

As Dr. Daniel Swayze, executive director of Beerthoven and emcee at Viva Lviv, pointed out in response to the tone of the night's programming and its speeches, there are Ukrainians naming newborn children after the Javelin anti-tank missile. These people have fight in them.

Producer Christian Herrera Is Building a Hub for Austin Hip-Hop

Elevate studio expands into South Austin multiuse creative space by clara wang

When Christian Herrera - aka local producer the Mask - was in seventh grade, he had no interest in music. With his family going through hard times, his stepmother brought him to a church so the pastor could pray over them. When the pastor laid hands on his head, she told Herrera that he had a gift for music, and that it would be his path in life.

Herrera says he didn't think much of the experience when it happened; he dreamed of joining the Army or becoming a Navy SEAL, like his cousin. But the pastor's words eventually came true as he discovered his path in life was to create music, becoming one of Austin's foremost hip-hop producers. Full-circle, Herrera now builds a large, multiuse recording studio and creator space, intended as a true community hub for Austin artists.

He hopes for the newly named Elevate Network to foster the next generation of Austin talent as the ultimate sanctuary for Central Texas hip-hop, R&B, and beyond.

Taking up just under 5,000 square feet of a 15,000-square-foot warehouse at 10203 Old Manchaca Rd., the multiroom studio will include four audio production suites, as well as dedicated spaces for photography, podcasts, merchandise, lounging, and a reception area. Herrera and his two silent partners started building in May and hope to open in January 2023. The facility joins a number of far-South Austin music activations near Slaughter & Menchaca, including rock-and-country-emphasis spots Sam's Town Point, Armadillo Den, and Moontower Saloon.

The new studio represents a bigger, better version of Herrera's previous Elevate Recording Studio at Music Lab's nowshuttered St. Elmo rehearsal facility, which he had developed into a gathering place for the Austin scene. His mood-lit rooms cultivated singles and albums for local standards like Abhi the Nomad, Blakchyl, Alesia Lani, the Teeta, and Y2. Elevate also became a go-to for national acts like DaBaby, NBA YoungBoy, and Sauce Walka to lay down features while in town.

Herrera lost his old studio space in the February 2021 sale of Music Lab's final Austin location. Displacing a number of musicians, teachers, and studios, the building became a Tesla showroom. When the sale forced him out, Herrera took it as a sign to grow the studio, physically and as a brand.

Born at Austin's Brackenridge Hospital, Herrera was raised on the Eastside by native Austinite parents. He spent much of his early childhood at his grandmother's house on Airport and Manor before moving to South Austin with his mother. After his parents divorced when he was in the fifth grade, Herrera was sent to live with his father and stepmother in San Benito, Texas. The artist remembers he "couldn't take the small town" and itched to get back to his birthplace.

With parents working for the state and city governments, he was the first in his family to pursue a creative field, which wasn't seen as a solid career option. However, two months after the pastor miraculously prophesied his talents, Herrera was inspired by a youth pastor performing Christian rap and began dabbling in music. By eighth grade, the youth pastor provided Herrera's first visit to a professional recording studio, in McAllen.

Although Herrera is no longer part of organized religion, he credits the church leader as a formative mentor. After initial production forays into Christian rap, by the time he hit high school, he was hooked on all kinds of beat experimentation.

"I was using the equipment at school, because I couldn't afford my own," he says. "I was only in ninth grade, and most people are still trying to figure out what they want to do at that age. I was already almost there."

Seeking to hone his skills, Herrera enrolled in the Art Institute of Austin and rented an apartment on Riverside. The day he graduated high school, when his friends were all partying on South Padre Island, he immediately drove to Austin and began studying audio engineering. At that point, he hadn't started making his own beats and wanted to learn the mechanics behind the magic.

Though ultimately cut short after three years because his financial aid ran out, his institute tenure taught him the terminology and techniques to parlay into his production.

"That's where I really got to fine-tune everything and be like, 'OK, this is what a compressor is, this is what an EQ is, this is what it's doing because I'm doing this," says Herrera. "That's what really took it to a whole other level."

After dropping out, Herrera moved in with his grandmother - still at their original Eastside house - to help take care of his great-grandmother, and worked odd security jobs while he figured out his next move. Gradually integrating himself into the hiphop community over the next few years, he mixed his first real-deal album for longtime Austin rap group Mindz of a Different Kind in 2015. For payment, Herrera was given the choice between a half-zip A Bathing Apebranded jacket or \$300. He chose the jacket, which he still cherishes to this day.

In 2016, he met Austin MC Sertified - the first artist he produced for - through mutual friends, ultimately an instrumental collaboration in introducing him to the scene. Herrera adds: "Through Sertified, other people started finding out about me and were like, 'Yo, this guy is really good at what he does. Where the fuck did he come from?""

Herrera adopted the Mask persona around this time and actually wore a white Jabbawockeez mask while at shows and socializing. From 2013 to 2016, he wore the face covering because he was self-conscious about a blue birthmark on his face - which started as a barely noticeable blue pigment near his eye as a child, but spread onto his cheeks and forehead as he grew older. Ditching the mask, he's kept the moniker. an acronym for "Music Art Self Knowledge."

"I started wearing that mask when I was going out because I wanted to peep the scene without people knowing who I was ... They knew I was there, but they didn't really know who I was," says Herrera. "Over time, I got more confident in what I was doing and who I was. Now I know the community I need to nurture."

From popping champagne to being generous with take times, Herrera wants to continue that nurturing at the new Elevate Network. Austin rapper the Teeta, who recorded his 2019 album Teeta World at the former studio, says he's "run into everybody" at Elevate and finds that there aren't many other spaces that "cater toward hip-hop artists in general." In a city where hip-hop acts often struggle to find accepting and affordable access to recording studios, Elevate provided a warm environment.

Austin's Mama Duke, who often worked in the space and writes collaboratively with Herrera, says: "In hip-hop as a queer, biracial woman, there's not a lot of safe spaces. It's a boy's club. The Mask was always one of those people who allowed me to pull up."

Over three years at Music Lab, preserved in Quin NFN's viral 2018 video for "Talkin' My Shit," the old Elevate became a hip-hop hot spot. After months of planning and searching. Herrera signed the lease for the new space in March. More than just a place to record, he wants it to be an epicenter for all types of artistic endeavors.

"Elevate was the ultimate church," says Herrera. "Now we're trying to build this hub where people can come and freely create."



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




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

Wizard Rodeo 2

Musical magic on a sandlot baseball field BY DOUG FREEMAN

The Long Time

On the naming of their local music gathering, Lindsev Verrill of Little Mazarn remembers: "Jack asked us to all just say the stupidest thing we possibly could. I said, 'Let's call it Wizard Rodeo,' and Jack was like, 'Ooh, that's good. That's very stupid."

If Wizard Rodeo was based on the absurd, the event's second year promises to build in the unexpected. Jack Sanders, architect and purveyor of sandlot baseball field the Long Time just east of Austin, originated

the idea last year along with Verrill, the Tender Things' Jesse Ebaugh, and San Antonio's space cowboy Garrett T. Capps. The team intended from the outset to create a unique artist and fan experience, slated next

Saturday, Dec. 3, from "noon to 4ever" with \$50 tickets at wizardrodeo.com.

"They came and talked to me about the type of festival they wanted to throw, a kind of experience where the whole thing is designed by the artists themselves." offers Sanders, whose baseball team the Texas Playboys swings as creative as it does athletic. "Just the genres, the range of music - I feel like Jesse and Garrett and Lindsey would say it's bands that have a tough time being real clear on what genre they are."

In addition to Capps' NASA Country, the Tender Things, and Little Mazarn, this year's spectacle draws in Alexalone, Santiago Jiménez Jr., Heavy Meddo, and Sheverb – as well as solo sets from the Black Angels' Alex Maas, Sweet Spirit/A Giant Dog's Sabrina Ellis, and A Hawk and a Hacksaw's Heather Trost. A "Drone Zone" of experimental artists will keep the music continuous between sets. while artist galleries, a vintage market, dance performances, and special surprise guests pepper the ballfield.

"Last year, we really tried to discover the bands that we were booking, and booked people that we didn't really know that well to play," attests Verrill. "The audience too, I felt, discovered some cool bands, and it was just a fun hang. It's a weird, liminal time of year with the weather, so there is this atmosphere of cold

outside and [campfires] and stuff."

A UT-Austin Master of Architecture, Sanders' past concepts brought Jack White's team to the Long Time in June and launched the 2018 "I'm So Gonna Vote" stickers. The

eclectic designer sees the day-fest as continuing the long tradition of outsider, independent events in Austin, a line that could run from the earliest days of Willie's Picnic to Woodshock to the Black Angels' initial Psych Fest. Like the Playboys' games, he considers the action in the crowd as important as the play on the field, and the event as a catalyst for gathering together.

"For me, that's an architectural and sustainability philosophy that started rooted in sandlot baseball, but has parallels in independent DIY movements of all types, including punk music and Austin in general," says Sanders. "Like, the Playboys' baseball games: There's an element of fun and loose, but it's just authentically Austin. That's harder and harder to find.

"[Wizard Rodeo is] a festival without feeling too much like a festival. Sandlot is about stripping every bit of excess away from baseball and just making it as pure as we can. I think this festival tries to do that, too."

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LIVE FOREVER: A TRIBUTE TO BILLY JOE SHAVER

(New West)

Billy Joe Shaver proclaimed his destiny on 1993 locomotive Tramp on Your Street: "I'm gonna live forever/ I'm gonna cross that river/ I'm gonna catch tomorrow now." As produced by Charlie Sexton and Freddy Fletcher, mostly here at the latter's Arlyn Studios, Live Forever: A Tribute to Billy Joe Shaver proves the trailblazing roots righteousness of its country-loving truthsayer note by note, line by line, proselytizer by proselytizer. Resurrecting the title track's crystalline trot first, Willie Nelson sets a throaty, reedy tone alongside Lucinda Williams' tart



twang. That touches off a murderers' row of heavy hitters as crowned by King George (Strait) himself distilling "Willy the Wandering Gypsy and Me" like God's own whiskey. Rodney Crowell inhabits "Old Five & Dimers Like Me" as if he wrote it, while Nathaniel Rateliff booms, "Let the world call me a fool!" on "You Asked Me To" in the second coming of Waylon Jennings. The chorus counters: Longview Texan Miranda Lambert weakens knees with her superstar drawl atop "I'm Just an Old Chunk of Coal"; Margo Price testifies with Joshua Hedley on "Ragged Old Truck"; and Allison Russell sanctifies "Tramp on Your Street." Honky-tonk heaven. - Raoul Hernandez

As if bouncing off the wooden floorboards of an empty cathedral hall, voices swell and rise on opener "Tree Funeral." An all-vocal album, with the exception of a touch of nylon guitar on "Make Me Love," Pregnancy Choir digs in - clawing back layers to reveal a beautiful glimpse into motherhood. Expecting her baby Juno during the time of the album's recording, Austin's Jenny Parrott bares a vulnerable and honest portrayal of pregnancy. Each blanketed vocal coalesces into a maelstrom on the cerebral work, either ascending into pining supplications ("Rain") or sinking into a densely knotted array of voices ("Origin"). In "6 Rows," Parrott's husked timbre and soprano weave delicately in solemn introspection, while "Runnin' to You" rings ebullient like a gleeful church chorale. Joyful, somber, chaotic, and dissonant all at once, an internal chorus grapples with the realities of pregnancy, from the thrill of life to the policing of women's bodies. - Alejandra Ramirez

STARTOGRAPHERS

Static Calls (Shifting Sounds)

Constructed of members from Magnet School, Schatzi, and Honeyrude, Startographers don't just recall that magical time when guitar rock meant shimmering distortion, jangling riffs, and soaring melodies - they embody it. Static Calls sounds like the glory days on the cusp of the Nineties, as Americans realized fuzz boxes could be used for more than power chords and before Brits discovered the shuffle beat. "Brick Balloon" and "Tied Up in Tokyo" marry six-string firestorms to sing-along melodies to induce closed eyes, dreamy swaying, and raised lighters. Soaked in delay and distortion, "We'll Go Down Together" and the title track match wistful romanticism with gauzy grunge, like shoegazer ballads made for the prom. Singles "Hollow" and "Backslide" scan lush and bruising, while "Icicles" drifts down with absent vocals and gentle feedback like an electronic ghost. Admittedly, there's little here that crosses the boundaries around postmodern guitar rock, but Startographers play with such obvious love for and facility with the form, it doesn't matter, Dedication - Michael Toland serves Static Calls well.

Y2

YaaYaa

A true shape-shifter in terms of his artistic aesthetic and uncanny flows: Germany-born, Austin-raised emcee/ producer Y2 still finds ways to evolve on what he brands as



his 23rd studio album. YaaYaa begins with heavy opener "Uncle JJ." where an upbeat. exotic instrumental unexpectedly complements a stream of Olympicpaced introspection. To introduce the 15-track project, the artist discusses reaching a

via a growing catalog of sync placements, battling sorrow over a slain relative, avoiding subsequent isolation, and parenting his son. Beats - of which Y2 produced nearly half - turn progressively darker with "Grill Muzik," featuring the sliding bass typical of Brooklyn drill. The jarring chords on "Jet Lag" clamor for inclusion in a horror film score. As the production morphs, a constant remains: Y2's technical ability to command attention with every syllable.

LARRY SEAMAN'S "WE GOTTA GET OUTTA HERE"

Former Standing Waves mainspring Larry Seaman says his latest release, recorded by Ron Flynt with help from Steve McCarthy and Whit Williams, covers "the confused state of mind the country is in." The solitary track was issued one month before the midterm elections. Being an old-school pop craftsman, Seaman couches his political commentary in the form of a love song, begging his beloved to escape this shitshow inside what resembles a White Album outtake. Complete with mock George Harrison lead guitar, it's a subversive and effective tactic. - Tim Stegall

MELISSA CARPER IN-STORE PERFORMANCE & SIGNING

Waterloo Records, Wednesday 30

Melissa Carper's musical sensibilities span every inch of a boot-scuffed dance floor, from Western swing and tears-in-your-beer country to blues-touched balladry and occasional R&B finishes. Ramblin' Soul, her fourth release, unveiled November 18, comfortably and neatly encompasses that range, rolling a sampler of Americana styles into a polished record that sounds wholly her own. Picking up where 2021's Daddy's Country Gold left off, the new collection showcases a broader and bolder



sound for the specialist in upright bass, which serves as the record's heartbeat.

If Daddy's Country Gold firmly established Carper as a solo artist outside of the Carper Family, Ramblin' Soul is a firm underline. The Nashville heavy hitters of her past LP are back, as Andrija Tokic and Dennis Crouch co-produced the new record, and a who's who of Nashville musicians fills out the compositions: Chris Scruggs, Lloyd Green, Billy Contreras, and Jeff Taylor. Despite her wallflower tendencies, Carper's effortless, genre-bending, and commanding-if-ethereal soprano – which earned her the nickname HillBillie Holiday – is the real star of the show.

Despite her ongoing ties to Music City, Carper returned to Austin, or just outside of it, in fall 2020 after a six-year break. We reap the benefits: A few days after she performs and signs Ramblin' Soul records at Waterloo, starting at 5pm, she'll take the stage at Stateside at Paramount next Friday, December 2. - Abby Johnston

TAMÉCA JONES

Pershing, Saturday 26

The "Queen of Austin Soul" relocated to Los Angeles earlier this year, seeking music industry opportunities beyond the live music capital. Lucky for her devoted Austin fans, she's back. Taméca Jones headlined the Continental Club last Saturday, a performance that marked her first musical appearance in town after a June headline at Antone's Nightclub, promoted as her last-ever local show. This weekend, a pop-up shop curated by Jones herself will allow attendees a chance to nurchase some of her old show pieces. sequins, and furs. - Derek Udensi

BERNELL JONES II QUARTET

Monks Jazz, Sunday 27 The last time Memphis-to-NYC

transplant Bernell Jones II hit Monks. it was in support of his EP Supernov-a, which was set for release the next day. It must've gone well, as the young saxophonist's latest release is a twosong digital EP of cuts from that very performance. This show promises to be quite a bit different, however, as Jones eschews the electric piano that gave his prior songs their warm glow. He instead opts for a chordless quartet alongside trombonist Paul Deemer, bassist Sam Pankey, and drummer Daniel Dufour local jazz hotshots all. Dive in and dig the versatility. - Michael Toland

BARTEES STRANGE, POM POM SQUAD

Empire Control Room, Tuesday 29

Ascendent 4AD indie star Bartees Strange is a formidably rangy talent, leveraging arena-ready bellows and whisper-nimble intimacies toward songs that map their emotional ups and downs onto a beyy of millennial-minded stylistic switchups. But don't call it nostalgia bait. If, for instance, the D.C.-based artist segues into trap rap triplets at the center of a Midwest-emo-styled track mounted on post-punk revival drums, the sonic synthesis comes wedded to lyrical themes too soul-deep to be called eclectic. To call Strange a "genre-hopper" is to misrepresent his artistry. He's standing in one place. Power-poppers Pom Pom Squad and Florida hip-hop experimentalists They Hate Change open.

THE HIDE OUTS ALBUM RELEASE

Antone's Records, Tuesday 29

The nostalgia cycle orbits like a needle on vinvl at Antone's Records, where mod-rock quartet the Hide Outs will be celebrating their late-September debut album, Colors & Shapes. The psychedelic surf score features tracks from 2018's She's a Mod, released as the Hungry Onions under Deep Eddy Records. Tom and Jimmy Doluisio pay tribute to old-school theme songs with "Superman" and "Secret Agent Man." A mid-Sixties influence saturates "Girl of the 13th Hour" and "This Love's Got a Hold on Me" through retro-layered vocal harmonies and guitar reverb, à la the Yardbirds and the Easybeats, on this translucent-orange Flak Records pressing. - Mars Salazar

ALEX COKE & CARL MICHEL SEXTET

Draylen Mason Studio, Wednesday 30

ATX jazz royalty Alex Coke (sax/flute) and Creative Opportunity Orchestra co-founder Carl Michel (guitar) both field decades of experience in and outside our town. With concert harpist Elaine Barber and steel guitar maverick Bob Hoffnar in their sextet's lineup, the duo pushes the boundaries of jazz sound into new territory, equally informed by folk and classical music as free bop and swing (see last year's The Emissary). With new album Emergence imminent, the band hits KMFA's beautiful Draylen Mason Studio to videograph new songs and arrangements of classics by John Coltrane, Paul Motian, and Valentin Silvestrov for a future project. - Michael Toland
