
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A CHANT ENCOUNTER

Austin Energy crews work Wednesday to restore power in the Dawson neighborhood. Wednesday morning brought the right combination of cold and precipitation to grind the city to a halt. Overnight precipitation blanketed heavy ice on tree limbs and power lines, and as of 11am Thursday, approximately 154,000 households, 28% of Austin Energy customers, were without power. The worst of the ice storm stretched south to San Marcos and north to Waco and beyond, with another 150,000 or so households without power statewide.

Musicians are a useful proxy for the unmet housing needs in Austin neighborhoods

The whole nation has a housing shortage, and Austin's is more acute because we grew so fast. Right now, almost all of that growth is happening outside the city limits, because Austin proper is full up. Watch us be officially stuck at just under 1 million people **AUSTIN** until we start building more **AT LARGE** housing units. (I don't know what happens when we reach 1 BY MIKE CLARKmillion; maybe a big bell rings.

In the city, there's a rental vacancy rate of between 5% and 6%. and for owned homes it's less than 2%. Those figures have remained relatively stable even as the population has boomed and housing costs have skyrocketed.

But where? And for whom?)

The Census Bureau already reports that Austin has more households than it has occupied housing units, so some people are doubling up. Others have simply

been priced out of town. We report in this issue on the new Austin

Music Census data showing a rapid outflow of musicians from Austin, and especially Central Austin, to San Marcos and Lockhart and Bastrop and such, fast becoming the live music capital's satellite venues.

Now, Austin decided back in the 1990s that musicians are the city's official mascot, so it tries to protect them specifically, even though its ability to execute on what it's promised is not great.

HOW WE LIVE IN BUSYTOWN

But musicians make a pretty good proxy for the largely unmet housing needs of Austinites in so many neighborhoods. For the money they make playing music, most performers categorically can't afford to live near where they need to work for those parts of their job they can't do at home, like playing for paying audiences. Musicians have onerous commutes with their work gear, just as other tradespeople do, which Project Connect and a new I-35 and dozens of miles of new sidewalks probably won't do much to ameliorate. They work odd hours when they need mobility and other services to be robust, like all the time. They need a steady supply of electricity.

HEADLINES

BABY, IT'S COLD OUTSIDE A bitter ice storm left more than 150,000 Austin homes and businesses (including the Chronicle) without power: Austin Energy anticipated all power would be restored by late Friday.

THEY ONLY HAD EYES FOR HER Cap Metro confirmed Dottie Watkins, who began her career at the agency as a part-time bus driver 30 years ago, will be its next president/CEO. Watkins has served as interim leader since Randy Clarke departed for Washington, D.C., last June.

THEIR LOVE IS HERE TO STAY? Elsewhere in the **Project Connect** universe, the **Austin Transit** Partnership named its interim leader Greg Canally, who moved over from the city finance office, as the "sole finalist" for its top job, surprising members of the Cap Metro Board and Austin City Council, given that ATP had made plans to conduct a nationwide search.

SOMEDAY THEIR PRINCES WILL COME With widespread staff shortages, the city of Austin will begin a major campaign to recruit new city workers, including police officers and medics. Officials say it will be the largest citywide hiring campaign in Austin's history.

ZILKER WEEP FOR ME After two hours of often critical testimony, the Parks and Recreation Board tabled consideration of the **Zilker Park Vision Plan**. Stakeholders including the Lone Star Sierra Club and Save Our Springs Alliance argued the vision is too commercialized and car-dependent and puts Barton Springs at risk: they've proposed a "rewilding" plan as an alternative.

SOMEONE (ELSE) TO WATCH OVER ME The indefatigable Judge Guv Herman may have company soon, as Travis County commissioners took the first step to create a second probate court. This requires legislative approval but creating courts is pretty routine; most major Texas cities have more than one probate court, and Herman. who was first elected in 1985, has already retired once. Most of the \$1.2 million for the new court, which handles involuntary mental health commitments as well as disputed wills, will come from the county.

BODY AND SOUL Multicultural Refugee Coalition, a nonprofit organization based in Austin that "provides dignified work with fair wages to refugees, immigrants and asylees," will receive a \$25,000 grant from Simply Organic. The donation will go toward a program that provides produce to newly arrived refugees through weekly CSA packages and community networks.

I COULD WRITE A BOOK The new \$37.4 million Round Rock Public Library drew over 11,000 visitors on its opening weekend. Located on E. Liberty Avenue (near Round Rock Donuts!), it's a few blocks from the former RRPL, which will become home to the city's chamber of commerce and visitors bureau.



Musicians like to live near other musicians, just as many Austinites want to be in neighborhoods with people who share similar needs and lifestyles so they can help each other out and more gracefully age in place, which should be easier in Austin than it is, but not be segregated by class or color or credit score. Musicians want to live somewhere with places to practice, just as others may need places to cook or grow food or sell what they make. If your neighborhood (or your town, in the case of Lockhart or Bastrop) works for musicians, it probably has the bones to be functional and resilient for all kinds of residents.

Austin as a city still works for musicians. kinda, because of the scale and network effects that come with being a big city with a distinct industry ecosystem and a worldwide brand. (Austin's rapid ascent to major cityhood was probably good for that ecosystem.) But Austin's neighborhoods don't work for musicians anymore, especially the ones where the music scene took root and blossomed, unless those players are unusually successful or have lived there 40 years. Those folks can NIMBY just like everyone else, but they're also aging in place.

It's not just because those areas are too expensive; many are straitjacketed by the city's broke-down wreck of a land use code. That's why its Development Services Department has been a pile of old, burning tires smoldering in a landfill for the entire 35 years I've lived here - it literally cannot make sense of the code (which keeps changing) to make decisions on permits, site plans, and subdivisions. Also ever since I've been here, there have been generally ambitious plans to develop housing just for artists and musicians, preferably on publicly owned land, of which Austin has much. It hasn't yet happened.

FROM MODEL TO MANDATE

Such projects have been suggested for the big new neighborhoods planned since our boom began - Mueller, the Domain, South Shore, Rainey Street, etc. - which have been able to create a better balance of accommodation, access, and amenity. Of course they're now also expensive because they're oversubscribed. They also take longer to build because, to make those neighborhoods pop, people throw out Austin's busted land use rules and create new ones, which creates political resistance and drag. Their experience has not sent a huge signal to the real estate community to build more such places and put in the work it takes.

But if you could just write into a new code the basics of how to make functional, resilient, urban mixed-use neighborhoods - which is not that hard, it's not like we're building underwater - then, I believe, you will see fewer musicians abandoning their playing careers in Austin because of the housing shortage. Can we get nine Council votes for that?

You can also write in details of how to redevelop and repair those neighborhoods when the need arises, as it has begun to.

For example: You know that U.S. retail is screwed, right? Like, there's no way America needs this much real estate devoted to in-person shopping, but it's being allowed to age in place for lack of planning. Austin retail is not as overbuilt as in some markets, but witness the oldest part of the Domain (near Braker Lane) and Mueller's regional retail center (off 51st Street), both now vulnerable. I don't know what the Domain's planners thought about future reuse, but Mueller's planned and built the regional retail center so that when the day came that those places would be more valuable as housing (or offices, or mixed space), the conversion would be simple.

Do You Avoid Driving I-35?

The chamber of commerce wants more of the same

Perhaps you missed the full-page ad that was on page 3 of the Austin American-Statesman this past Monday, As a public service, it's reproduced below. Dear Chairman Bugg and Commissioners:

PUBLIC Thank you for recognizing NOTICE that I-35 through Austin is one of the most congest-BY NICK ed roadway segments in BARBARO the State of Texas. As this seriously outdated roadway is often called the Main Street of Texas, all Texans should call for bold and decisive action to transform this critical stretch of infrastructure into a roadway that will accommodate the rapid and immense growth we are experiencing in our great State.

Accordingly, I am writing today to express my complete support for the I-35 Capital Express Central design as proposed by TxDOT.

Thank you for your consideration of this request.

The ad and form letter are brought to you by Opportunity Austin, the Austin Chamber of Commerce's "five-vear regional economic development initiative aimed at fostering job-creating investment across the Austin region," and to repeat, it pledges "complete support for the I-35 Capital Express Central design as proposed by TxDOT" - that is, without the more ambitious reinvention of the corridor that's envisioned by the Reconnect Austin or Rethink I-35 coalitions, or even the more modest improvements that are backed by the chamber's longtime stalwart fellow travelers, the **Downtown Austin Alliance** and the Urban Land Institute. Good to know where the chamber stands.

And ves. there's still a very narrow window for those who might want to see a different way "to address congestion. safety, and environmental deficiencies along this 8-mile stretch of road." That window largely depends on the federal highway department deciding that the TxDOT plan is not the best way forward; thus the need for public lobbying such

as this, which seems just a tad desperate when seen in that light.

I don't have a form letter for you to send: instead I'll refer you back to Mike Clark-Madison's feature last week. "Endless Highway," for more on the topic.

To that end, the I-35 Town Hall that was scheduled for last night, Thursday, Feb. 2, with Council Members Chito



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Twice in Three Years

The police kill, advocates rally, white people urged to act

A mother, grieving for her son who was recently killed by Austin police, stood before a crowd gathered at **Huston-Tillotson University** to call for an end to police violence. "What keeps me going every day is my commitment to myself and my son," she said to the crowd of thousands assembled before her, "so that no more moms and dads and children go through this torture that I live under while we wait for answers and only hear lies."

That was **Brenda Ramos**, in June of 2020. Last Saturday, Jan. 28, another mother, also mourning her only son after he was killed by Austin police, stood before a different crowd, again assembled at Huston-

Tillotson to grieve and demand an end to police violence. "My son was murdered by APD," **Liz Gonzales** began. "They don't know how much this tears us apart as a family. I can't focus on anything because I'm determined to get justice for my son."

The Austin Justice Coalition organized both rallies at H-T, each prompted by lethal police brutality elsewhere as well as in Austin – George Floyd, killed by police in Minneapolis in 2020, and Tyre Nichols, killed by police in Memphis in early January. At this year's rally, AJC Executive

Director **Chas Moore** reflected on the need to hold two of these somber gatherings within three years. "We had 15,000 people on this field" in 2020, at the beginning of the "George Floyd Summer" – a reckoning over race and policing in America that swelled and crested amid the chaos created by the COVID-19 pandemic. "We had at least 12,000 white people saying, 'I'm ready to step up and do what needs to be done.'

Yet here we are again."

So, "What does that sign in your front yard [about] 'Black lives and science' actually mean," Moore continued, "if you're not disrupting the powers that be to ensure that the lives that you have plastered on your yard

signs and on your posters are actually saved?" Once again, Moore was addressing a mostly white crowd.

After the rally, Moore told the *Chronicle*, "Black people suffer enough. It shouldn't be on us to fix this system, so I'm glad white people are out here listening. They just need to act."

Liz Gonzales also hopes the crowd that gathered Saturday will help pursue justice for her son Alex. But unlike Brenda Ramos, whose son's killer, Austin police Officer **Christopher Taylor**, has been charged with

murder, the path to justice for Gonzales has narrowed considerably. She has sued the city, like too many grieving families before her, but the cops who killed her son, Officers **Gabriel Gutierrez** and **Luis Serrato**, will neither face criminal charges nor be fired, or even disciplined, by police Chief **Joe Chacon**.

Gonzales' killing a year ago began as a road rage incident with either Gonzales or Gutierrez – accounts differ – swerving his car in front of the other driver. Gutierrez told investigators that as the cars came side by side, Gonzales pointed a gun at him and he fired his own in response. The officer

emptied his clip, firing eight shots and hitting Gonzales in the side of the head and his girlfriend **Jessica Arellano** in the back, neck, and lungs – all while their 3-monthold son sat in the backseat.

The two drivers then parked. Gutierrez called 911, describing Arellano as lying on the ground outside the passenger door and Gonzales as standing next to the driver's door with blood on his face. Officers Serrato and **Brian Nenno** arrived, pointed their guns, and shouted orders. Dash-camera video shows Gonzales walking around the back of his car, unarmed, to check on his baby. Serrato yells,

Making Life Easier for Child Care Centers

The new City Council's first-ever regular meeting Jan. 26 moved at an exceptionally brisk pace. Mayor **Kirk Watson** got things going right at 10am, as he promised to do, and adjourned for the day around 2:30pm. It was a City Hall reporter's dream.

The item of the day was a resolution from Council Member **Vanessa Fuentes** to make it easier to open **child care centers**. "Every single neighborhood should have access to high-quality child care and it should be accessible and affordable," Fuentes said before her resolution was approved unanimously. "This policy is rooted in that."

Fuentes' resolution increases the number of children that can be enrolled in each location, creates a grant fund to help pay the city fees associated with opening or expanding a child care center, and – thanks to an amendment from CM **Chito Vela** – eliminates **parking**

requirements entirely. This is a goal of housing advocates, but it also will let care centers better serve children and possibly get them more funding from the state.

As **Cathy McHorse**, who leads the **Success by 6**early childhood education program at the United
Way for Greater Austin, helped explain, the

Texas Rising Star program offers enhanced tuition reimbursements to child care centers that serve families with lower income and exceed state licensing standards – one of which is the amount of learning space available, which can increase if the amount of parking space decreases. "We also know that the quality of programs impacts the long-term development of children," McHorse told the

Chronicle. "So having higher-quality learning environments not only could help operators financially, it would undoubtedly be better for the children they serve, too."

Anthony and Joanna Carrillo operate the **Mockingbird MicroSchool** out of a duplex they own in South Austin; they are seeking a conditional use permit allowing them to care for more than six children. After spending a year bringing the property up to state standards, the Carrillos ran headfirst into the city's development bureaucracy and its many fees. Anthony Carrillo said that after speaking with land use attorneys and engineers, he anticipates paying from \$50,000 to \$100,000 to get the permit, mostly to pay an engineer to draft a site plan. "It was extremely discouraging," he told the *Chronicle*. "I have experience opening businesses, so I was prepared for roadblocks, but what I've experienced in Austin has been much harder than anywhere else."

But Anthony and Joanna intend to persevere so they can expand. For one thing, they're already eyeing a spot on their property for additional programming – maybe an air-conditioned gym, maybe another classroom – that under current regulations would have to be parking. "I don't know what we would use the space for just yet," Carrillo said, "but anything would be better than a parking lot." – Austin Sanders

"Don't reach!" repeatedly. Gonzales pushes his head into the back passenger-side door and Serrato fires 10 times into his side and back, killing him and sending bullets flying within 3 feet of his baby.

The Austin Police Department's statement excuses Gutierrez's conduct as self-defense, a claim for which there is little publicly available corroboration. It says that Serrato followed department policy, though the video shows that he did not try to de-escalate the situation. Both the Office of Police Oversight and the Community Police Review Commission recommended that both officers be fired.

Chacon's rationale, of course, offers no solace for Liz Gonzales, who is still learning to navigate the world without her son. She remembers Alex as someone who loved to

be outside, hiking, fishing, and hunting. He was generous and playful; someone who "would give you the shirt off his back and the food off his plate." Liz, Alex, his father, and his sister would frequent the scenic trails of Mt. Bonnell. There, Liz recalls, she and Alex would wander the mountainside together for hours, connecting through conversations about life and family.

"I'm not able to do that anymore," Liz told us. "That's what they took from me. My baby. They took my baby and our future together."







Ascension Solves Blue Cross Crisis, Moves On to Several Others

The new year has been chaotic for hospital nonprofit Ascension Texas, the former Seton Healthcare. Through most of January. Ascension and Blue Cross Blue Shield of Texas, the largest health insurer in the region, were in tense negotiations over what Blue Cross will pay for Ascension's services to its 66,000 members, with a Feb. 1 deadline. Ascension wanted more money. Blue Cross says Ascension's already too expensive, but the hospitals announced an agreement last week. Blue Cross followed with a Jan. 30 statement from BCBSTX President Jim Springfield: "As a customerowned health insurance industry leader, we must protect BCBSTX members' access to care at fair rates. This new contract reflects our mutual commitment to quality, affordable health care."

Meanwhile, to ring in the new year, The New York Times published a powerful exposé on Ascension's padded executive salaries and understaffed hospitals across the country, where patients linger without care and overworked nurses struggle. Austin's recently unionized nurses at Seton Medical Center report similar conditions; on Jan. 26 they held a candlelight vigil outside Ascension Texas' headquarters in Mueller to protest the preventable loss of life caused by understaffing.

Local labor leaders and U.S. Rep. Greg Casar lent support as nurses described Ascension's "cold shoulder" in response to their concerns. Current policy is to hold up to 20% of a unit's positions vacant, and in fiscal vear 2021 Ascension's net profit was \$6.4 billion, "so we are very confused when our staffing levels are not to par." This is hard on the nurses, which adds further staffing pressures, but those at the vigil highlighted increased risks to patients - longer stays and readmissions, preventable medical errors and avoidable complications, and "even potential death while under our care."

This is particularly true in obstetrics; Seton has one of Austin's busiest labor and delivery units and has seen a steady increase in deliveries since 2021. Nurse Kellen Gildersleeve, in a written statement delivered to Ascension management last week, detailed the "extremely precarious" state of the High-Risk Labor and Delivery unit and the increased risk of obstetrical hemorrhage, the leading cause of preventable pregnancy-related deaths in the state. "During an obstetrical hemorrhage, seconds matter."

Gildersleeve continued that during summer 2022, the HRLD unit had to indefinitely cancel elective inductions - considered a "risk-reducing" procedure - for months, and delay cesarean sections by hours "or even days" because of inadequate staffing.

In a statement, Ascension called last week's vigil "a bargaining tactic," referred

to its "robust workforce development program," and said it will "continue to negotiate in good faith" with the nurses.

The same theme - Ascension wanting more money to deliver less care to (and with) fewer people - is at the core of its legal dispute with Central Health, as we reported last week. At issue are about \$80 million per vear in federal funds that Central Health directs to Ascension, under the terms of a 2013 agreement, to cover safety-net care, including for patients in Central

Health's Medical Access Program. Ascension says the MAP rolls have grown from 25,000 to 29,000 (true!), so it wants more money. Central Health says Ascension has never treated more than 18,239 MAP patients in one year, and now treats fewer than 15,000. (Also true! At least that's the data Ascension shared with Central Health.)

IN PUSH FOR CHEAPER STUDENT HOUSING, FIFTH TIME'S THE CHARM?

For the fifth time in 13 months, UT-Austin's **Student Government** is begging university leadership to get on board with building more affordable housing on campus. And for the fifth time, they find themselves waiting for a response that might not come.

In November, members of UT's Student Government voted unanimously to implore administrators (Prez Jay Hartzell et al.) to rapidly expand housing supply. Close observers of the UT student body might sense déjà vu - the same resolution passed, in separate councils as well as the previous student assembly, with near-total support four times between 2021 and the most recent vote.

The current version, Assembly Resolution 17, does not require the university to do anything specific except acknowledge the herd of Longhorns demanding more income-restricted housing. As luxury high-rises continue their takeover of the once quaint West Campus neighborhood, students face burdensome rents, many opting to take residence in East Riverside/Oltorf. That's a problem, the student body argues, as research has linked living closer to campus to higher retention rates, grades, and overall academic achievement.

Since student body Prez Leland Murphy signed the resolution on Dec. 12, action from UT administrators is "still in the process," he said. The last time they did this, in 2021, the Office of the Dean of Students suspended the joint resolution process a week later, which meant no meetings on the subject - dead on arrival.

This resolution doesn't address privately owned apartment complexes; it focuses on building more undergraduate housing facilities on UT-owned land. In alignment with the 2015 Student Life Master **Plan**, key spots include Clark Field, Thompson Conference Center, and Creekside Hall.

"You can't just rely on the private market to provide affordable housing," said Ethan Smith, who authored the resolutions while finishing his second bachelor's from UT in 2021. "My model recommends

that UT should, in a traditional bond finance manner, create more undergrad housing, and they should engage with the private market for graduate housing." Smith, who wrote a sprawling thesis paper about on-campus housing capacity, said, "The state has much more powerful tools to this end than the city." One major advantage is that UT doesn't pay state property taxes. Per Smith's proposal, UT can pass along those savings to students.

Under the Texas Advance Commitment program, broadened in 2020, UT students with a family adjusted gross income up to \$65,000 receive full tuition coverage. Some campus leaders say that, while that's admirable, too many low-income students drop out or struggle academically due to housing costs. "If you are in leadership at a university, and you do not engage with the students meaningfully on policy issues, what does that say? This is a university with real, substantial issues about its strategic direction, and the biggest reason is the cost of living in Austin," Smith remarked.

Without significant interaction from UT leaders (yet, at least), Smith said his next step is taking the fight to the **Texas Legislature**. Last month, he announced a draft Senate bill for the creation of a housing affordability endowment fund. It's a bit of a Hail Mary – he's knocking on doors, messaging reps on LinkedIn, and doesn't care if it's a Republican or Democrat who bites on this legislation. The jury's out on whether this proposal will be ignored in that hall of power, too.



Water - who's got it, who doesn't, and will any of it be left in 30 years – is already top of mind for Texans. Reservoirs are drying up, six **boil water notices** are issued every day. and aging rural systems are losing 572,000

acre-feet of water per year to leaks and line breaks - more than the 2020 demand of Ft. Worth, Austin, Laredo, El Paso, and Lubbock combined. Luckily, it seems both parties at the Legislature want to make change happen, as the existential threat of dwindling supply becomes clearer - even if they can't say the words "climate" and "change" in the same sentence.

"I'd be very surprised to hear the Legislature at large talk about climate change, but I do hear a lot of talk about drought and

flood, and what happens if the temperature goes up," says Jennifer Walker of the National Wildlife Federation. "They're talking around it without naming it, but more so than I've ever heard. It's kinda painful, tiny baby steps – but a little bit of progress is being made."

Last week the Texas Water Foundation announced the first Water Caucus in Texas history, with 38 House reps from both parties (including Democrats representing Travis. Hays, and Williamson counties). Its No. 1

> priority is simply to educate lawmakers and aides about the state's fragile water infrastructure. Many already have information-gathering on the brain, like Reps. Erin Zwiener, D-Driftwood, and Ron Reynolds, D-Missouri City, whose House Bills 57 and 846 would study the impacts of climate change. Rep. Richard Raymond. D-Laredo, has HB 570, a drought and wildfire study, and Sen. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock, has Senate Bill 296, which would require updated water availability mod-

eling for river basins in East and South Texas. (The Colorado and Brazos basins have more up-to-date models.)

How will this bipartisan group leverage that information? According to Texas 2036, a state policy think tank, the U.S.



Environmental Protection Agency estimates it'll take \$65 billion to fix the state's water infrastructure. Between a historic \$32 billion surplus and \$2.9 billion in federal funds for water infrastructure over the next five years, the main state agency focused on water - the Texas Water Development **Board** – should be able to get a good start.

The state must put up some money to match the federal funds (allocated via the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act). The Texas Living Waters Project (an umbrella coalition of NWF, Lone Star Sierra Club, Galveston Bay Foundation, and

Hill Country Alliance) is asking the Lege to appropriate \$125 million. Additionally, they'll ask for \$5.3 million to pad TWDB's **Economically Distressed Areas Program**, which helps strengthen (or simply install) water/wastewater systems in low-income rural areas.

At last week's Water for Texas conference put on by TWDB, Comptroller Glenn Hegar and other Republicans showed support for directing some of the surplus toward water. Perry, whose district includes about 30 rural West Texas and Hill Country counties, proposed a \$2 billion investment in aging

Bill of the Week: Republicans Tell D.A.s to Bang Cymbals Together Like Animatronic Monkeys

Prosecutors won't take on every case that crosses their desk. That discretion is critical to district attorneys for both practicality and morality - so they can effectively allocate their resources and avoid putting innocent people on trial when evidence just doesn't stand up.

But Texas' big-city Democratic D.A.s, including Travis County's José Garza, have drawn the ire of Republicans for announcing they will refuse to prosecute doctors who provide abortions, parents who get transgender care for their kids, and people with small amounts of cannabis. In response, Texas Republicans have filed companion House and Senate bills that would severely limit discretion not only in those cases but across the board.

The bills don't name the D.A.s that Texas Republicans have dubbed "rogue prosecutors," but it's clearly targeted at Garza, Dallas County D.A. John Creuzot, and the three other urban D.A.s who pledged in a joint statement not to prosecute people who seek or provide abortions. (During an October

hearing of the House Committee on Criminal Justice Reform, Republicans expressed frustration with these five.)

A Travis County D.A. spokesperson said, "Regardless of which debates our legislature takes up, the Travis

> County District Attorney's Office will remain focused on prosecuting violent crimes." Garza declined to comment on the new bills, but he's explained

the importance of prosecutorial discretion in the past. At a press conference in June after announcing that he wouldn't go after abortion providers, Garza said, "A prosecutor's job is to protect public safety. To enforce this [abor-

tion ban1 will not only fail to promote or protect public safety, but will also lead to more harm."

House Bill 1350 and Senate Bill 378 (from Rep. David Cook, R-Mansfield, and Sen. Tan Parker,

R-Flower Mound) would bar prosecuting attorneys from limiting the enforcement of any criminal offense – by "policy ... pattern or practice." It would allow Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton to sue D.A.s who do avoid certain cases. Then,

if the A.G. wins in court, the D.A. will have to pay between \$1,000 and \$1,500 for the first violation and about \$25,000 for each subsequent violation, with each day of a continuing violation constituting a separate violation and fine, which could mount to astronomical levels after a few days.

Cook told The Dallas Morning News that he filed the House bill because "carte blanche public pronouncements by district attorneys, that laws we have on the books will be ignored. renders the authority of the Legislature to determine what is and isn't a crime moot." Meanwhile, Parker unironically said some prosecutors are "more focused on political posturing or driving a political agenda than they are on enforcing the law," though choosing to avoid low-impact crimes can increase the offices' chance of success in more pressing cases.

If D.A.s are required to put all of their resources into prosecuting all crimes on the books, they're gonna need "exponentially" more money and people to get it done, said Miriam Krinsky, executive director of nonprofit Fair and Just Prosecution. "Not only would that be a ridiculous use of limited resources, but it doesn't make us safer." - Maggie Q. Thompson

AISD PICKS A SEARCH TEAM FOR NEW SUPERINTENDENT

At a lean meeting last week (Jan. 26), the **Austin ISD Board of Trustees** hired a search firm to help the district look for its fourth superintendent in five years. **GR Recruiting**, which won the \$42,000 contract, will be responsible for advertising the AISD opportunity, taking community input on the profile of an ideal candidate, finding candidates, and reviewing and screening applicants. In Texas, this search is usually done out of public view until a "sole finalist" is announced.

Trustee **Noelita Lugo** – who chaired the committee that recommended GR Recruiting to the board – stressed the importance of a transparent and rigorous hiring process. The search firm "is an investment for the district [that] gives us access to a far more expansive and growing pipeline of potential candidates. So not just current superintendents, but others who may not have otherwise known of the position but can be recruited." Over the last few weeks, the committee reviewed proposals from five firms, invited three to give oral presentations. invited two

to a second meeting and called their references, and made its selection Jan. 23.

GR Recruiting will begin by laying out its timeline – trustees have said a new superintendent should be hired in June – followed by community engagement. During the search, Interim Superintendent **Matias**Segura emphasized, "stability does not mean being static and just sitting idly by." He presented on the district's top priorities for the next six months – among which are improvements to special education, multilingual education, teacher/staff morale (increasing pay being "top of the list"), and **Mendez Middle School**.

As part of the 2022 bond program, which Segura ran as the district's operations chief before taking over for departing Interim Superintendent **Anthony Mays**, architects are starting designs in the next few weeks. As for long-struggling Mendez, Segura said he toured the campus recently and he's hopeful that the new in-district charter will raise the school's Texas Education Agency performance rating to a passing score in the next year.

infrastructure and another \$1 billion for water supply development, including treatment of both seawater and "produced water," which is the byproduct of fracking. However, advocates say those projects should be a last priority, as they are expensive and can be environmentally damaging.

Both TWDB and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality are under Sunset review this session, which creates opportunities to give the agencies more authority and resources to make Texas water systems more resilient. Stakeholders like Sierra Club will push to strengthen financial assistance for low-income communities like the perennially stricken colonias in the Rio Grande Valley. They're also seeking programs that encourage voluntary reversion of private rights to surface water, to maintain healthy environmental flows in waterways. "We want as much of that water to make it downstream to the

Gulf as we can [get]," says **Alex Ortiz**, Sierra Club's water specialist.

In Central Texas, the water supply crunch impacts groundwater more than surface water, as demand on aquifers increases with the region's ongoing rapid growth. It's a challenge because development outside of cities is largely unregulated; advocates would like to see counties get more authority to restrain growth to maintain water supply. Perry's GOP Senate colleagues are proposing the opposite, taking away power that cities have to manage their own growth. Sen. Drew Springer, R-Munster, has filed SB 149, which would prohibit any city ordinance that "imposes a restriction on commercial activity." Sen. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola, and Rep. Tom Oliverson, R-Cypress, have bills to ban municipalities from setting pre-platting requirements for developers, which usually include having a guaranteed water supply.



LEATHER MAGNOLIAS

How two gay-owned barbershops are changing the face and faces of East Austin

haircut is elemental to a person's look, so the business entrusted with creating that cut is incredibly important. For a queer person, the choice of where you go for a cut, color, or trim means not just finding skilled cosmetologists but also a space that welcomes and celebrates your identity. In East Austin, the owners of two barbershops are using their personal histories as gay men and hair care professionals to bring community to the forefront of the barbering experience.

On one hand, it's hard to say Daddy's Barbershop is new, since the brand owned by Arlen Lasater has been around for over 15 years in both San Francisco's Castro District and Palm Springs. Yet it's new to Austin, taking the space above Cisco's Restaurant Bakery & Bar to bring "the gay leather version of Steel Magnolias" to East Sixth, Lasater explained.

His niece, Terry, and nephew, Tim, are both Austinites and were involved in bringing Bat City's vibe to Daddy's. That includes a waiting room ceiling covered in beautiful wood reclaimed from two fires: the Texas Capitol fire of 1983 and the Texas French Bread building fire of 2022. Upcoming decor also includes murals from local trans artist Xavier Schipani, who has also done work for brands like Nike. "[Schipani's] work really signifies what we're looking to embrace in this town," Terry said. "That's really the heart of Daddy's ... giving back to the culture that we love and support."



ARLEN LASATER, OWNER OF DADDY'S BARBERSHOP

Lasater's journey with Daddy's started with an intended ending: At age 46, after many years as an overseas driver for the Consulate of Singapore, he approached his employer about retiring from the business. To his shock, no retirement plan was available for overseas workers. "I had a friend [who was a sex worker] ... He, too, was thinking about his future and his retirement, all that shit," Lasater recalled. "He decided to go to barber school. So I supported him and watched him through barber school, and I'm thinking, 'Hm, I think I'd be really good at that."

Despite his aim being the high-paying world of hair color, Lasater eventually followed that same friend to a chair at a nearby barbershop called Joe's, where he worked for three years. After Joe's expanded to a new location, in 2007 Lasater returned to their then-empty former shop and signed the lease to make it the first brick-and-mortar Daddy's. The title speaks to the shop's connection to San Francisco's leather community as well as being Lasater's own nickname. Even before becoming a barber, Lasater was heavily involved in leather and served as head of security for Folsom Street Fair. Daddy's also sponsored several leather title holders – folks who, not unlike beauty pageant queens, competed on local, state, and international levels while representing the Daddy's brand.

All that growth made the COVID-caused closure of the original Daddy's in 2021 a challenge, but not an insurmountable one. A native Texan, Lasater began to look for his shop's future in the Lone Star State. Austin made the most sense, with Lasater considering San Francisco and Austin to be basically sister cities. "The whole tech industry decided to take up space in Austin," he added, "which meant so many of my clients moved to Austin ... it was a perfect opportunity for [growth] but I probably would have done it anyway." He praised the Eastside area Daddy's is settling in for the people it's attracted: a thriving community full of young hipsters ready to create change. "It's also going to be gay

friendly," he said. "Because we're [a] gay driven barbershop, I didn't want a neighborhood that really wasn't. And the first thing I saw was the gay flag on the street."

Just around the corner from Daddy's is another barbershop that champions the Eastside's worth. Tucked away in Saltillo Lofts is the gay-owned Scruff's Barbershop, easy to find with its logo of a handsome ram etched into the storefront glass. Owner Tim Durant explained that their horned mascot represents perseverance. That ability to survive and thrive shows in his own 25-years-

long dedication to the hair care industry. He started on the salon side before eventually trying his hand at a more high-level barbershop concept, which meant convincing a clientele more attuned to simple service to adopt a more pampered experience.

Similar to Lasater. Durant moved from his

home state of Texas to California (specifically, Los Angeles) before settling in Austin. The elevated barbershop experience he strives for is a holdover from a more Cali state of mind, where he said most barbershops are considered hybrids with salons in terms of experience. "Whereas here in Texas, I believe the barbershop is a little bit more underrated," he said. "A lot of times, unfortunately, it's a walk-in, quick haircut, just get taken care of and vou're out the door, vs. it being more of a full curated experience for them, personalized."

With Daddy's, Lasater mirrors Durant's desire to create a more fulfilling barbershop experience than just a trim. Especially for the queer community, he said, elevated

grooming is a must. "The queer community loves to look good," Lasater stated. "The gay boys like to look good." His clients aren't those who flock to salons, fine with shelling out big bucks for a cut and color. They're folks who want a great haircut in a safe space.

Both Durant and Lasater speak to creating a queer-friendly and welcoming space as an intentional process. Lasater emphasized education as important to developing a safe space. Understanding the correct vocabulary to use with the trans & queer community helps to make the barbershop more

comfortable for everyone. Ultimately, the only people who should feel unsafe in Daddy's, he said, are assholes. "If you're an asshole," he emphasized, "you're not going to come in here." Most of all, having the barbershop be a safe space allows everyone to let their hair down. "If you've ever watched Steel

Magnolias, it's the gay version," Lasater reiterated, "and we have a really good time."

In Scruff's, Durant seeks to make the barbershop a community environment that can stand beside gay bars as a space where queer people happily congregate. Previously, he said, many in the LGBTQ community migrated to salons to avoid the not-so-welcoming, hypermasculine vibes of ye olde barbershops. However, that isn't the case in modern shops like Scruff's, Durant said. "The big bridge for the queer community [to barbershops] is that those barriers that we had before [are] broken down by people like me, shops like Daddy's," Durant said. "We're not accepting what was told to us before. We're creating something new."


Five Exhibits Beyond Mere Eye Candy

SONDHEIM STAGING IS SHARP, BUT SHOWS THE BENEFITS OF A LITTLE MUSICAL RAGGEDNESS BY BOB ABELMAN

Legendary composer/lyricist Stephen Sondheim's Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street won the 1979 Tony Award for Best Musical. But with 85% of its dark, dramatic storyline sung, and a score requiring the talents of a tormented F2-Gb4 bass, flamboyant B2-C5 tenor, and sprightly Bb3-A5 soprano, it was only a matter of time before the Austin Opera would give it a go - its first musical since opening in 1986 and, to date, its highest-grossing show.

Still, genre-jumping comes at a cost.

Sweeney Todd revolves around a despondent barber (bass Kevin Burdette) out to avenge his wrongful imprisonment and the senseless destruction of his fledgling family, Living in seedy Victorian London.

Todd whittles away at his clientele with a straight-edge razor as the fruits of his labor are processed into meat pies and sold in the shop below by his delightfully demented landlady, Mrs. Lovett (soprano Mela Dailey, singing alto), all the while waiting for the evil Judge Turpin (bass/baritone

Ron Raines) to walk through his door. It was Turpin who set this madness in motion, and now the lecherous guardian of Todd's daughter, Johanna (soprano Raven McMillon), and the nemesis of her beloved sailor, Anthony (baritone Mark Diamond, singing tenor). is deserving of the closest shave he's ever had.

It has become fashionable and cost-efficient of late for mountings of Sweenev Todd to serve up minimalistic production values with a downsized dramatis personae: Not so in this production under director Doug Scholz-Carlson's steerage. The stage is brimming with multistory pieces and parts that rotate and roam with ease, purpose, and dramatic effect. And because the musical has now transi-

tioned into the realm of opera, that performance space is also filled with classically trained artists with powerful head voices and, it seems, genetically engineered diaphragms. Bob Fosse once said that "the time to sing [onstage] is when your emotional level is too high to just speak anymore." In opera, there's the additional need to sing in heightened expression with raised volume per the traditional tropes and techniques that guide the art form. The featured players in Sweeney Todd do this brilliantly and masterfully manage Sondheim's dense and difficult lyrics, demanding vocal range, and enigmatic melodies.

But much of the sweet subtlety and emotive phrasing woven into Johanna's lyrical "Green Finch

> and Linnet Bird" and Anthony's delicate love song "Johanna" get lost in McMillon's gorgeous but overwhelming soprano and Diamond's beautiful but excessively generous tenor. Similarly, Mrs. Lovett's assistant Tobias Ragg's youth and intellectual disabilities are

betrayed by Christan Sanders' physical maturity and powerful projection. Dailey's Mrs. Lovett, too, sacrifices some of her character-defining macabre charm and humor at the hands of her well-honed classical technique and tone. Still, there is much gained by a Sweeney Todd gone operatic. Bille Bruley's powerful vocals and fine acting provide his Beadle Bamford with a scene-stealing moment at the harmonium, and Angel Romero as Pirelli, the singing barber, is terrific. Best of all is when Burdette allows an intriguing dose of melancholy to seep through the otherwise dark and forbidding vibrato he has gifted Todd.

SPECIFIC SPACES ARE NECES-

SARY, even in the already specific realm of queerness. Such is the power of nonprofit **Queer Black Women Alliance**, a local (for now) organization dedicated to elevating the mental health and business pursuits of LGBTQ Black women. They throw many delightful social events, like bowling nights, roller skate parties, and even an upcoming lingerie soiree just in time for Valentine's Day. This Sunday they'll be holding a family-friendly park get-together at Mt. Playmore, noon to 3pm, so queer Black women with kiddos can enjoy time with other adults while their little ones play.

QBWA first came about as a group chat, according to group President Arijah Rashid. A Navy veteran formerly stationed in Maryland, Rashid said her initial goal was to create a space of comfort while she completed her degree at UT-Austin. The chat's original name, Queer Women of Color Alliance, was later changed when Rashid found that broad inclusivity didn't garner what she needed from the group. "Often black folks are made to feel like they're not allowed to have a safe space for themselves," Rashid explains over email. "However, we have a very unique experience that is tied to our blackness and there's nothing wrong with that. The intersectionality of Queer Black Womanhood is special and something to be celebrated."

That recognition of queer Black women's unique experience is something grant writing director **Nneka Izagbo** was also looking for when she joined QBWA. Izagbo came to Texas from Maryland like Rashid and says she initially tried to develop a social life in her new home. "I soon realized what I wanted was community," she says, describing QBWA as "a space that will always be a safe haven to the community because it is filled with like-minded women that look like me; a space where I am always met with love and assurance as opposed to uncertainty."

Rashid soon turned QBWA from a group chat into its current nonprofit status. In doing so, Secretary **Annette Ngene** says that the space has created many opportunities for professional networking and personal friendships. "Eventually, we also hope to **grow the alliance to reach various cities in the state, country, and internationally**," she adds, "so that more queer black women can reap the benefits of having a healthy space like ours in a way that is accessible to them."



The Luther Hotel in Palacios might be gone by the time you read this. Despite the community's best efforts to save the 120-year-old wooden structure, the new owners will probably replace the historic building with a modern resort.

A court hearing on a temporary restraining order delaying the demolition is set for Feb. 2 in Bay City. The legal action is the Palacios Preservation Association's effort to get the owners to consider saving the landmark.

The hotel closed in July 2022 after it failed a fire code inspection, says Margaret Doughty, spokesperson for the preservation committee. Crews have fenced the property and started dismantling the interior. The phone booth from the hotel's lobby was moved to the town's museum.

The fate of the Luther became questionable in 2020 when its longtime owner, Jack Findley, died. The Ed Rachal Foundation of Corpus Christi contracted to purchase the bayside property from the heirs with the stipulation that the building be removed.

The community discovered the agreement when **Preservation Texas** sounded the alarm by calling the Luther Hotel "the Most Endangered Place in Texas" on Nov. 2, 2022.

The Hotel Palacios was built in 1903, the year after the Palacios Townsite Co. was created. The first guests were farmers looking to buy 160-acre garden plots.

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places and as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, the hotel received a Texas Treasure Business Award in 2013.

Hurricane Harvey did a double whammy to the building by twisting the foundation and drenching the insides, according to a Texas



Historical Commission assessment in October 2022. The report said the building "remains in repairable condition."

Palacios is a sleepy village of around 4,500. Seafood, agriculture, and the **South Texas Nuclear Project** are the main industries. Even though it's the closest access point to the **Gulf** from Austin, the town has never taken off as a major tourist destination.

The Ed Rachal Foundation hopes to change that with a family-friendly extended-stay resort.

Claudio Reyna Steps Down as Sporting Director

Claudio Reyna, the architect of Austin FC's roster since the club's inaugural season who last month became a central figure in the ugliest family feud in American soccer history, stepped down from his post as Austin FC sporting director last Thursday. The club announced that Reyna will remain an active member of the ATXFC front office in an advisory capacity, but will no longer serve as the chief decision-maker on roster-related issues nor as a front-facing representative of Austin FC in dealings with outside clubs and players.

"I am grateful that [Austin FC majority owner and CEO] Anthony [Precourt] and the organization have given me the opportunity to scale back my role and responsibilities while continuing to contribute to the success of a club that I love," Reyna said in a statement. "I take great pride in what we have accomplished but am looking forward to a less all-consuming work pace that still permits me to assist ongoing club development."

Revna had served as Austin FC's sporting director - the soccer equivalent of general manager - since late 2019. He had previously held the same position with New York City FC, another MLS expansion side he helped get off the ground. With Austin, Reyna oversaw the construction of a roster that within two seasons emerged as one of the league's top sides, reaching the Western Conference Final in 2022. Under Reyna, Austin FC's front office identified and acquired several underthe-radar MLS veterans who have gone on to star for the Verde and Black, including Diego Fagundez and Brad Stuver, and secured

the services of Designated Player Sebastián Driussi, an MVP candidate in 2022.

However, Reyna's future with the club became immediately uncertain in early January when multiple reports detailed a shocking saga in which he and his wife, Danielle, disclosed private information to U.S. Soccer officials regarding a decadesold domestic assault committed by U.S. men's national team head coach Gregg Berhalter, in apparent retaliation for Berhalter's treatment of their son Gio during and in the aftermath of the 2022 FIFA World Cup Qatar.

In a previous column, "The Verde Report" argued that the Berhalter saga revealed too many flaws in Reyna's character and judgment for him to remain in his role as Austin FC sporting director.

Reyna's shoes will be filled, at least on an interim basis, by Sean Rubio, who had been serving as ATXFC's director of player personnel over the past two seasons. Head coach Josh Wolff will also assume elevated responsibilities on the roster-construction side, the club announced. The announcement also made it clear that Revna will continue to have an active role, especially early on, "to help ensure a smooth transition of responsibilities."

Austin FC has 28 players officially signed ahead of the 2023 season, which begins February 25 when El Tree hosts expansion side St. Louis City FC at Q2 Stadium. Not among them, though, is striker Moussa Diitté, whom Austin FC loaned out to French Ligue 1 side AC Ajaccio on Tuesday.

Referee Ismail Elfath on a World Cup Final for the Ages

Last month at the 2022 FIFA World Cup Qatar, Ismail Elfath became the first American referee ever assigned to the mostwatched sporting event on Earth, the World Cup final. Elfath, whose refereeing career started with U-8 youth matches in North Austin, spoke with "The Verde Report" for over an hour about his entire 45-day experience overseeing matches on soccer's biggest stage. Part two of that conversation is below. Some responses have been edited for clarity.

Verde Report: After you refereed both of your group stage matches, how did you learn that you'd be sticking around for the

knockout stage as well? Ismail Elfath: It's a very high-tension moment, the moment when the appointments for the [knockout stage] matches are read out. It's in this big meeting room with 150 or 170 people, but you can hear a pin drop because people's dreams are about to be realized or not. The announcement is for who is going to remain and who is going home. FIFA does

it in a really great way because if your name is called, you go up and get your medal. That means you are being released, but it's a moment to recognize what you have achieved at the World Cup. But you're sitting there waiting for your name not to be called.

VR: What did it mean to you, learning that you had been selected for the final as the fourth official?

IE: Me and my team, we had a goal. We're not going to go to Qatar to just do a game or two. We're going to try to reach the highest participation level possible, which is the final. So for us, we did the knockout game [Japan vs. Croatia] and it went really well. We knew we were in consideration. So during that period of time, the talks and the rumors and the chatter in the hallways and social media ... everyone has a theory, and our name kept showing up in those theories! And that's what we wanted. Gain respect for our country, respect for our program. And then, you know, you stand in that room again and your name is read out for the final. For us it was a dream come true.

VR: Walk us through the day of the final as you remember it.

IE: The first thing, you cannot stop staring at the [referee] jersey with the World Cup final teams and stadium and date on the front and your name on the back. And then at the stadium, you're pretty much trying to slow down time and make the moment last. Of course, the moment you're walking out onto the field, you see something in front of you that you've never seen before. The World Cup trophy is right there. It's something almost surreal. But once the whistle blew. the next three hours until the end. I don't remember any of the excitement except the work I had to do, because I was busy. I was really busy with the two benches, helping the referee, watching the play, helping out as much as I can. And honestly, it didn't hit me how massively exciting the game was until the next day when I was reading about it, and how epic it was.

> you talked about representing your background and your culture every time you referee a match. How much was that on your mind the day of the final? IE: It's always on my mind, because I see it in the mirror every day. That's why I do it, to open the door for the next person and tell them that

you can do this. In refereeing,

VR: When you last spoke to us,

the notion that USA is not a soccer nation. But we are a soccer nation. There's no more any discussion that we cannot give these big assignments to U.S. referees because they're "not a soccer nation."

Touching From a Distance

Oscar-nominated drama Close explores the tortured friendships of teenage boys by Jenny NULF

Where does the line get crossed when writing an inherently sad story? Belgian filmmaker Lukas Dhont's latest film Close is a devastatingly heavy watch, a delicately filmed tragedy that takes hold of your emotions and never lets go for the duration of its run time. It feels like a slow descent into depression, with grief laced throughout like a rising tide rather than a tsunami of sorrow.

Close is about Léo (Dambrine) and his best friend, Rémi (De Waele), two 13-year-old adolescents who are inseparable, attached at the hip, constantly intertwined with each other and

blissfully happy. Their bubble is burst when school starts, and a few classmates start questioning whether their relationship is purely friendly or if there is something more between them. Close doesn't make use of overt bullying tactics that have been worn out over time. and Dhont finds subtlety in Léo's spiraling and internalized homophobia. Ouestioning his own friendship, he begins to push Rémi away at a time where he needs a friend most.

Léo's reaction to losing Rémi is complicated and messy, and Dhont utilizes a lot of restraint when it comes to exposition and chooses to convey Léo's feelings through actions and not dialogue. It's impressive and moving, and Dambrine's performance is astonishing for

someone of his age. Dambrine is perfectly cast: With his baby-blond hair and big blue eye, his features are bathed in innocence, so when his face twists up in guilt, it says more than any words could. He's the soul of the film, the core that makes the film as powerful as it is.

Close is heartbreaking, but not necessarily in a punishing way, although it does toe the

line from time to time. It's a tearjerker by definition, a term that is often synonymous with manipulation, but not all manipulative stories are fundamentally bad. When the sorrow comes from a place of kindness,

it often feels good to let go and cry to a story that touches your heart. Close is weepy, but it's not unrelentingly so, which is to its benefit.

However, it's hard to know what Close is really saying in the end. Dhont's filmmaking doesn't ever confirm or deny whether Léo and Rémi were queer in any way, and chooses to focus on how masculine culture dictates how boys should act around each other, and the consequences it has on the mental health of young children. The film doesn't need to explicitly comment on their sexuality, and while leaving it open-ended does feel a bit incomplete, it doesn't necessarily take away from the film's beautiful exploration of Léo's feelings for Rémi.

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THE AMAZING MAURICE

Why can no one make a genuinely great Terry Pratchett adaptation? He's arguably the most engaging and accessible of modern British authors, his extensive bibliography a fixture on every bookshelf in the island nation. Most especially, his 41 volumes set on the magical, satirical Discworld are as incisive as Dickens, hilarious as Twain. Pratchett was also adept at aiming different books at different audiences while still feeling Pratchett-esque.

There have been a slew of Discworld TV shows and movies but they've always come up short of the books. Maybe it's because Pratchett's storytelling is best in the aggregate: not simply a series of sequels, but as overlapping narratives, where supporting characters become leads and vice versa. So maybe that's why the surprisingly charming The Amazing Maurice (breezily retitled The Amazing Maurice and His Educated Rodents) may be the most entertaining conjuring of Pratchett's literary magic to date.

Possibly it's because it's the simplest, a fantastical replay of the 1971 comedy Skin Game, in which James Garner and Lou Gossett play two con men running a morally justifiable grift on Southern racists by selling Gossett's free man into slavery over and over again. Here, it's Maurice convincing credulous villagers that they need his ratting servives. For who would you rather hire to run off rats than a cat? What the hicks don't know is that ginger tom Maurice (Laurie) is in on the scam with both his human "owner" (Patel) and with the pack of talking, sweet-natured

rats with whom he wanders the country. It's when they arrive in the town of Bad Blintz that their arrangement gets knotty, as the townsfolk are convinced they already have an infestation. But if so, Maurice and his gang wonder, why are there no rats to be seen? And what exactly are the local ratcatchers, and most especially the mystery-shrouded Boss Man (Thewlis), up to? And when will self-described literary heroine Malicia (Clarke) work out what everyone's up to?

Maybe the success of The Amazing Maurice is because the book is closer to a stand-alone Pratchett than most of his works, one that doesn't rely on knowing your Ankh from your Morpork. Maybe it's that the script by Terry Rossio (Aladdin, Shrek) comes closer than most to translating Pratchett's witticisms to dialogue. even if he does so by vaulting through the plot.

But it's still not quite Pratchett-y, still a little static - most especially in the oddly flat animation – and still not quite snappy enough. But that doesn't stop Maurice being an entertaining way to convince kids to pick up the book.

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
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The Power of Platonic Intimacy in Close

Director Lukas Dhont explores tender moments of boyhood in his new drama by RICHARD WHITTAKER

A kind word. A hug. Compassion. All expressions of affection that are seemingly unforgivable for teenage boys, or deliberately misinterpreted. "We seem to underestimate the power and the importance of intimacy between men," said Lukas Dhont, director of Close.

Short-listed at the Oscars as Belgium's entry for Best International Feature and released this week. Close centers on the rift that appears between two best friends, Léo (Eden Dambrine) and Rémi (Gustav De Waele). Their bond, built on sleepovers and roughhousing, shreds when they arrive at high school and are told that boys just shouldn't act like that. The result is a devastating change in their lives, which Dhont (who co-wrote the script with Angelo Tijssens) sees as being rooted in the loss of that kind of platonic intimacy. "When you listen to 13-year-old boys talk about their male friends, it's testimonies of love. But we live in this dominance-based masculine culture that actually tells them that a desire for connection is seen as a weakness."

While not autobiographical, Close draws on his own childhood experiences of reaching that age when young boys start to pull away from "or be more performative in my male friendships, because I felt society felt uncomfortable with that warmth."

The story takes place at what Dhont called "the fragile age" between childhood and puberty, and so he drew on the instincts and emotional truths of the two young actors - after all, who knows better what it is to be a 13-year-old boy than a 13-year-old boy? He explained that they brought "this radical pureness that makes you closely connected to something you had lost. So we talked very openly about loss, about bruising, and about friendship, [and] they said some incredibly intelligent things that really shaped the story." That reshaping included a pivotal scene when Léo tells Rémi a bedtime story. The script had "a very show-off metaphorical story about a boy falling into a black hole," but Dambrine told Dhont this wasn't realistic. "He told us, 'I would never say anything like that,' and I went, 'Great, because that means you are comfortable enough to tell us that."

Dhont noted that there is a lack of films tackling such male relationships, without them either being sexualized or the butt of jokes. "We have been focusing the camera a lot on the battlefields - and I mean that in a poetic way - and not so much on clinging on to each other." Or, at least there was a lack of such films when he started the writing process. He was reminded of how when Julia Ducournau took her debut feature, Raw, to Cannes in 2016 "she thought she was going to have the only film about cannibalism and really, why could she not - but when she arrived, there were five. And really I feel the same way, because when we arrived in Cannes we had, all of a sudden, plural pieces in which there seems to be this examination of friendship in the masculine universe."

Yet while Close centers on young men, Dhont stressed there is a broader message about how every group in society "is divided into boxes with expectations – on boys, on girls, queer or not queer. You realize that, yes, we have been conditioned to look like that."

SHE IS LOVE

D: Jamie Adams: with Sam Riley, Haley Bennett, Marisa Abela, Rosa Robson. (NR, 82 min.)

The fear of a bump-in with the ex. It's why we steer wide of a certain bar, a corner store, a street. In the case of Patricia (Bennett), a New York talent scout on a business trip in England. she probably should've avoided a whole city altogether. But circumstances force her to spend a couple nights in Cornwall, where she was once married, and the cruel winds of fate place her ex-husband, Idris (Riley), a washed-up DJ, at the same B&B. Oh, and his pretty, twentysomething girlfriend Louise (Abela) is there too.

That is a crackerjack setup, but crackerjacks do not a meal make. She Is Love is more like a situation in search of a compelling storyline. It's written and directed by Jamie Adams, a prolific British indie filmmaker who's consistently managed to attract talented actors to his projects. (I've only previously seen his limply comedic 2015 film Black Mountain Poets.) She Is Love's end credits acknowledge "additional material" by the cast, and I suspect a vigorous rehearsal process helped shape the characters' inner lives and their out-loud interactions. Problem is, that background and intention don't always migrate onscreen, rendering character motivations a mystery. Without a strong spine, the film moves slackly adrift from room to room and various character combinations that vibe awkward then vicious then drunk and horny.

Still, you can see why actors would be drawn to this kind of showcase for their range, and Adams really does have a terrific trio to work with. A decade-and-a-half removed from his breakout role playing Ian Curtis of Joy Division in Control, Riley subverts his often killer-cool persona to play an artist on the other side of fame

- overtanned and hanging on to the relics of his youth, not realizing that grasping only ages him. Cowed by Patricia and Louise alike, his Idris is like a little boy drawn to women who can level him with a look. Abela in particular has a withering one (check out her work on HBO's Industry; she also stars in the upcoming Amy Winehouse biopic), but her part takes a backseat to the central push-pull between Idris and his ex-wife. Bennett is a gale-force wind, as unpredictable and inexplicable as a weather event. (Her accent is just as confounding.) I couldn't tell you why she and her director decided this seemingly successful professional should act like a complete maniac, but by the time she's smeared in commedia dell'arte-inspired face-paint, I stopped questioning it. She's stunning.

The actors commit. They dig in and they dig deep. The handheld camera is chosen on purpose – the better to convince us this is real life. right? Forty minutes in, that camera gently skitters around Idris and Patricia: they are reminiscing, they are drinking too much, they are getting too close. They get up and dance, and Adams does something interesting. He replaces whatever song they're bopping up and down to with a spare piano score. He slows the tempo of the action down, and he makes thoughtful shot selections, honing where the audience fixes its gaze. We're not thinking about the song; we're watching how these two move and parsing what it means.

Five minutes later, Adams ruins the effect, putting Louise in a dance scene of her own. She's in a bedroom, getting dressed, stewing over what's going on with her dumb boyfriend and his crazy ex. She puts on a sexy little number - it's Brigitte Bardot cooing "Moi Je Joue" - and dances around. Only this time it's cut like a music video: Here's Louise on her feet, shimmying at a mirror. Here she is gyrating on the floor. Now she's in the bathroom doorway. Now she's on the floor again. Intellectually, we know we are watching a series of takes spliced together. Emotionally, it ruins the feeling of continuity, that we are catching something raw and intimate. For a movie that's ostensibly about scratching at real feelings, it comes off as phony as a perfume ad. *** - Kimberley Jones

SWORD ART ONLINE THE MOVIE: PROGRESSIVE - SCHERZO OF DEEP NIGHT

Remember Leeroy Jenkins? The legendary meme spawned when a *World of Warcraft* player wrecks a carefully planned raid by just storming off and accidentally causing a bloodbath of his own team?

My mind drifted to Leeroy deep into one of the interminable strategy debates in Sword Art Online Progressive: Scherzo of Deep Night, the sequel to 2021's Sword Art Online: Progressive – Aria of a Starless Night and the latest installment in the massively successful anime franchise about schoolkids trapped in a virtual fantasy MMORPG (massive multiplayer online role playing game).

It's the second in the SAO - Progressive sub-strand, re-telling stories from the core continuity, much like the massively successful Rebuild of Evangelion series. Yet for anyone who watched the original anime, Starless Night felt like a diversion of sorts, concentrating on heroic determined noob Asuna (voiced by Haruka Tomatsu in the original Japanese language version and Cherami Leigh in the English dub) and seasoned gamer Mito (Inori Minase/Anairis Quiñones), who was a much smaller character in the original series. Scherzo lands back on the heart of the show, the fractious relationship between Asuna and the roguish Kirito (Yoshitsugu Matsuoka/Bryce Papenbrook), with Mito still off being a mysterious loner.

It also lands in one of the most tedious elements of all MMORPGs: dungeon grinding. The first film was about clearing level one, now at least the action has jumped to level five (only 95 to go ...). And therein lies a trap for SAO:

The characters, who must defeat the entire massive game or die in the real world, barely mention the truly life-or-death menace. Instead, there are endless discussions about guilds and strategies and buffs – a change, although not an improvement from the first film, which had less of a script and more of a player's handbook. Humorless and clunky, for much of *Scherzo* you'll be desperately hoping for a full-on Leeroy Jenkins moment, just to alleviate the tedium (or at least someone to teach the cast how to say "rapier").

And then, you get it. About halfway into Scherzo, when Asuna finally tracks down Mito on the way to an epic, Tron-influenced boss battle, and the burgeoning tenderness between Asuna and Kirito starts to find its footing in a touching, intimate scene that could readily have ended the movie, all that exposition and strategizing falls away. Or rather, it feels like director Ayako Kono has done enough world building that he can relax a little, and start building up the threat that will define future films. The Sword Art Online - Progressive films were intended to give fans something new, something a little more meaningful, and while Scherzo doesn't completely deliver, it's at least intriguing enough to make vou think, "Well, maybe one more level,"

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

Japan's 8mm Revolution

Hachimiri Madness exposes Austin audiences to the new radicals of Eighties cinema BY JENNY NULF

Everyone entangled in the film industry complex, from directors to critics, can name that moment - the specific film that totally changed the trajectory of their life. Sometimes it's what you expect, a critically acclaimed darling that is steeped in cinematic historical significance, but for others it's sometimes much more obscure than that, a film that's so down and dirty that it feels impossible that it was made, or that you even discovered it.

For AFS Cinema's programmer Jazmyne Moreno, the filmmaker that took her down a rabbit hole into a treasure trove of punk rock Japanese cinema was Masashi Yamamoto. the man behind some of Japan's most vibrant, rule-breaking films from the Eighties and Nineties, like Robinson's Garden (1987) and What's Up Connection (1990). Moreno said, "I was a teenager in Oklahoma, just finding things on the internet and absorbing whatever I could and I saw a film, Carnival in the Night by Yamamoto, and it completely blew my mind. So, to get to play his films [is] a dream come true for me."

Yamamoto is one of the many filmmakers featured in the upcoming series Hachimiri Madness. It's a monthlong exploration of the era defined by the movement known as "iishu eiga" (which translates to "autonomous film"): By the 1970s, Japanese cinema was stagnant, with cinematic norms inspired by auteurs like Ozu and Kurosawa, and the time was ripe for a renaissance. With 8mm cameras, a handful of young, scrappy, self-financed filmmakers went out and produced their visions, ones that couldn't exist within the walls of a stuffy industry stuck in a loop.

Filmmakers showcased in the season include Sion Sono (Suicide Club, Love Exposure), Katsuyuki Hirano (Yumika), Shinya Tsukamoto (Tetsuo: The Iron Man, Kotoko),

Shinobu Yaguchi (Swing Girls, Wood Job!), Macoto Tezka (The Legend of the Stardust Brothers, Tezuka's Barbara), and Akira Ogata (Boy's Choir). While many of their catalogs are accessible in the United States, there are some more unknown directors featured in the series, like Nobuhiro Suwa (Paris, Je T'Aime segment "Place des Victoires") and his first feature, Hanasareru Gang, whose French New Wave-influenced style is a bit of a standout in the series. His 1997 film 2/Duo has been recently restored, and Moreno said she expects to screen it at AFS "soon enough, but he's a filmmaker that people just do not know here. [Hanasareru Gang] is one I absolutely love, and it's him in a different mode, because most of his films are usually so serious, but you still see his interest in European film in the very beginning."

Another one of Moreno's favorite directors, Gakuryū Ishii (August in the Water, Angel Dust), is included in the series. His short film, directed as Sogo Ishii, "Isolation of 1/880000" (which plays February 15) is a fascinating character study of a young man living in solitude, studying for his university entrance exams, having already failed once. It's a powerful little film, desolate in its hopelessness, and nearly 50 years later it still feels culturally relevant, something Moreno believes applies to all the films. "I think the series is eternally youthful," she concluded. "There's a sort of restlessness, anger, and enthusiasm that's always going to be relevant and timely. It conjures all of those emotions, and it's also just impossibly cool."

Wheat-Free Without (Much) Misery

Helpful tips from a newly reformed gluten addict in Austin by Jessi Cape

Last summer I decided to finally address my lifelong year-round "seasonal" allergies. Fortunate to have insurance that mostly covered the adventure, my first "skin prick" test had been decades in the making. Little did I know, about a year after retiring as the Chronicle's Food editor - a role defined by glorious feasts - my renaissance would feature an extensive overhaul of nearly every single morsel in my diet. Science offered the sweet relief of validation that I wasn't dramatic or overreacting, and in fact had been underreacting my whole life.

The test results, you wonder? Well, basically I'm allergic to air and food; light and water are fine. In all seriousness: To a known anaphylactic allergy to one tropical fruit and a now-confirmed supersized battery of environmental allergies, I add a not-life-threatening-but-definitely-intense wheat allergy. The reactive list also includes barley, hops, malt, and yeast, plus sensitivities to soy and cow's milk, among other things. Are you chuckling yet? That was my first reaction – instant gut-busting laughter - then curiosity: Does everyone's tested and "scraped" back look as if they'd been pelted by angry red paintballs on a grid? NO. Could this little lightbulb of mine explain why I felt like a pile of poisoned compost every day? YES.

Having a wheat allergy is different from celiac disease, but the range of symptoms can be just as severe, including anaphylaxis for some. (I'm not a doctor or scientist, but essentially: A wheat allergy occurs when your body produces antibodies to attack the invader proteins found in wheat; with celiac disease, a specific protein in wheat gluten – causes an autoimmune reaction.) Even on the spectrum's mild side, an intolerance to wheat and its many derivatives can make an allergic person feel absolutely awful, with symptoms including nasal congestion, digestive issues, bloat, fatigue, etc. (Imagine the suffering when combined with our locally infamous cedar fever!) Allergy shots are a viable option for some and an

EpiPen is essential for severe cases, but overall, the best remedy is to avoid wheat ... easier said than done.


In my ongoing examination of not just what and how I eat but why, I'm grateful to have so many options here in Austin. So here I am, eight-ish months later, with an assortment of delicious ways to - by choice or necessity - avoid wheat around town and at home. It's absolutely not all-inclusive, and I am here for your recommendations. Perhaps most importantly: If I've ever been a jerk about "voluntarily" choosing a gluten-free (easier to explain than wheat-free) diet before my diagnosis, mea culpa. Truly.

When you're jogging toward wheat-freedom, it can be easier to whittle down the surprisingly endless "what to eat" options by cuisine. Focus on the protein- and produce-forward options and you're already in good shape. When cooking at home, check substitution guides for ingredients you can swap without much effect on flavor or technique - there are more than you'd think! If you are struggling during the fight for reduced allergy attacks, remember the first rule of Wheat-Free Club: We don't talk about the screwups. We just do our best.

NO NEED TO DINE WITH THE DEVIL

We're incredibly lucky to enjoy countless groceries, markets, restaurants, and bakeries in Austin that understand the wheat-free assignment, though not all are dedicated gluten-free like Wilder Wood, the 100% dedicated gluten-free restaurant with chicken-fried steak, waffles, cider, and everything else you crave. In the interest of space, here's a smattering of other recommendations.

Many West African dishes feature wheatfree starches like plantains, hominy, sweet potato, and cassava. One native superfood, fonio, is an ancient gluten-free millet that can be used in place of couscous. Pick some up at Whole Foods and try a Senegalese mango fonio salad. From the continent's

Eastern coast, Habesha Ethiopian Restaurant is a must: The best way to scoop doro tibs (sautéed spiced chicken) is with injera - a big and thin, round and spongy sourdough flatbread made from teff, a naturally gluten-free lovegrass native to Ethiopia/Eritrea.

Japanese cuisine is delicate, bold, and complicated, and it's one of my favorites, but there are

traps! When you opt for sushi (nigiri or sashimi), mind the wheat-laden soy sauce and miso. Noodles? Avoid ramen, soba, udon, yakisoba; opt for rice or any of the options listed below. Fried delights? Ask about the batter; cross your fingers for a gluten-free tempura, which is delicious. Komé, an Airport

Boulevard mainstay, has a big selection of noted gluten-free items, including soy sauce. Their sashimi lunch is one of the best steals in town.

Thai food most often gets its umami boost from fish sauce, not soy, and rice noodles are the standard, so go nuts for tom yum, pad thai, or a green curry. Get dinner at **Thai Fresh** and make sure to try the salty caramel brownie, one that just happens to


use a house-made mix containing rice flour, tapioca starch, and potato starch. Many Indian main courses are easily wheat-free fare and Tarka Indian Kitchen is fast-casual but damn good. There's no "missing out" with their long list of options including tikka masala fries, vegetable pakora, and mango cheesecake. Another flavor powerhouse, Spain, gave the world tortilla españo-


> la and paella, and many dishes boast seasonal veggies, cured meats, beans, and carbs on the side. Explore the gluten-free tapas options at Barlata.

> Latin foods boast the classic combo of rice. beans, and corn. And never forget the Brazilian geniuses who created pão de queijo, or tapioca cheese balls, which you can find in the freezer section of your nearest H-E-B or Central Market. If you

go the Tex-Mex route, your best bet is a fajita platter full of proteins and veggies with corn tortillas. Beware: Not all corn torts are made equal, so a good rule of thumb is that if it's not handmade, it's a sneaky wheat risk. ATX Cocina is a 100% dedicated gluten-free fine dining restaurant that delivers incredible Mexican-inspired fare, including queso fundido (I love you 3,000).

Speaking of grilled meats, popular dishes on Greek and Middle Eastern menus are an easy herbed-and-spiced win, but be wary of falafel, which often has wheaty binders. (I know it's from Cali, but the Kebab Shop is so approachable and delish.) I'll not namedrop barbecue spots because I don't want to incite a riot, but generally speaking, choices exist if you avoid the soppin' bread and cobbler and inquire about the sauce. Opt for smoked turkey and vinegar-based slaw.

Pizza is another hot-button topic, but mission-critical in my world, so I'll just say this: Via 313, Local Slice, and ABGB all have recommendable gluten-free crusts. If there's a tipping point: Pinthouse has hard kombucha (JuneShine) on tap. Beyond pizza, Intero Restaurant offers a lovely selection of wheat-free Italian dishes, including handmade pasta with housemade gluten-free flour, plus a focus on zero-waste and chocolate expertise.

I'm only mentioning Schlotzsky's, the Austin-based chain, because if you find yourself on a road surrounded by fast-food joints, their gluten-free buns are remarkably tasty and excel in their role. Burrata House's first location outside of Los Angeles lured me with the ooey gooey promise of burrata, and I was pleased. Gluten-free bread is available for the panini, and you can substitute quinoa for the farro in the bowls. We're team Quality Seafood for life: Don't bother looking at the rest of the menu, because all you need to remember is that peel-and-eat shrimp and fat Gulf oysters don't have a single iota of wheat. And they've got one helluva fish market to boot.

DESSERTS. DUH

I think if there's one thing everyone embarking on this journey fears, it's that you'll never be able to enjoy your favorite dessert again. False! In fact, if anything, I've been happily baking again (or at least assembling the incredible Krusteaz gluten-free line of boxed mixes) and seeking out new sweet treats.

Frozen desserts are fairly wheat-freeeasy, and a few local faves include Luv Fats Ice Cream (avocado and coconut milk base). Gati (100% gluten-free ice cream and baked goods), and Jim-Jim's Water-Ice (gluten-free, a million flavors). Custards and other eggy delights are a solid bet, so maybe wear your best to-be-seen-in outfit and order the crème brûlée at Justine's Brasserie, huh?

Love & Cookies is a small, Lakewaybased, mail-order cookie (and dough) biz that won H-E-B's 2022 Quest for Texas Best contest, which means their Whitney (oatmeal, raisin, and spice) gluten-free cookies are available on shelves! When you've

got gluten-free pastries on the mind and shopping for cool home goods in a lovely showroom on the agenda, newcomer Maaribu is your goal. Get thee to OMG Squee, the 100% dedicated GF shop, and order everything: mooncakes, lemon butter mochi donuts, and any flavor of macaron

Austin has a ton of local chocolates; just aim for the pure cacao varieties like Joaihu Chocolate. Also, flourless chocolate tortes are a chocolate lover's dream! If you too have been missing the delicious, sophisticated meringues from Fluff Meringues, please share any recos for local makers of the naturally gluten-free wonders.

SNACKS THAT DON'T ATTACK

Snacks don't have to be garbage, or relegated to popcorn, because we've got topnotch consumer packaged goods in Austin. Toodaloo Trail Mix, for example, is a newish local startup founded by Cattie Khoury. Each of the five flavors is delicious - and plant-based, non-GMO, gluten-free, dairyfree, and grain-free, with zero processed sugars, refined canola, or palm oil - and every bag contributes to organic regenerative farming. You know, so someday we can escape the monoculture death spiral?

The ATX-based snack food company You Go! just launched a "healthy" keto (thereby wheat-free) chip, which is excellent news for salsa fiends like me. The grain-free chip royals, Siete Foods, are the Austin original responsible for my crunch-crack, cinnamon Churro Strips. Insert big heart-eyes emoji.

Frozen cheese pizza isn't technically a snack, unless a middle-schooler is involved, but it is the ultimate comfort food. The H-E-B brand MightyCrust pies are pretty tasty at a great price. Nonlocally, CauliPower 'zas are saucy and yum; Cali'flour Foods pizza crusts are worth keeping around for either pizza or actual pie crusts, but they taste healthier than we usually dig.

That's the thing about this journey: If you don't find ways to tailor your revamped eating style to your cravings and needs, it won't stick. But when you start to feel more like a fully functioning human again, those dietary tweaks and adjustments soon become life-affirming habits that just might offer enough renewed energy to tackle the next phase of your self-improvement journey. Or not. Either way, embrace change and give yourself hella grace.

WET YOUR WHEAT-FREE WHISTLE

Alcohol is a minefield for us wheat-freezers. Here's a breakdown of what you can safely imbibe.

Seltzers: White Claws and most other hard seltzers are gluten-free, but things way down on the mystery ingredient list could be tricky, because their alcohol comes from fermented sugars derived from a blend of grains (including malt, corn, and wheat). Glucose in general "might contain wheat" and malt is derived from barley, so, yeah.

Teguila: Traditional teguila made entirely from the blue agave plant is naturally gluten- and wheat-free. Cheap "mixto" brands might be a different story. Some of my go-to brands are Dwavne "The Rock" Johnson's Teremana Small Batch. Casa Dragones (co-owned by Mexico's first official maestra tequilera), Tequila 512 (local), and Clase Azul (for fancy nights). And I've heard of Lucky Stash - a new local hemp teguila but haven't had the probable pleasure yet.

Sake: The nuance of sake is akin to wine. and like tequila, the wheat-/gluten-free status depends on quality. Basically it's four ingredients: sake rice, water, yeast, and koji (a type of mold that grows on rice ... and other grains, hence the technical toss-up). Choose a "junmai" and you're probably okay, but it's not quaranteed. We have a local maker: Texas Saké Co.!

Vodka: Because it's distilled from either wheat, rve, or potatoes, this spirit can get tricky, but it's a good option. Local global superstar **Tito's Vodka** is distilled from corn in copper pots.

Gin: Same deal as vodka and tequila. That said, risk or not, my favorite watering hole, the Silver Medal, carries original and cranberry flavors of the canned Finnish Long Drink, a gin-based bubbly delight.

Whiskey: The Celiac Disease Foundation considers whiskey gluten-free, but many severely allergic folks take issue because it's made from any number of grains. You could opt for corn whiskey, but I do not. Tell me vour wheat-free whiskey secrets!

Wine: Yes, grapes are fine. It's the oldschool (vintage?) wheat-paste-sealed barrels and potential fining process contamination that get weird. If your allergy is severe, try natural wines and seek sommeliers' advice, but otherwise you're probably fine. Oh, and wine coolers? Hard pass.

Beer/Cider: Well, it's definitely a situation. Austin Beerworks' website explains their famously "clear" beers are about half the federal limit for parts per million, the gluten measurement, but because of the origin ingredients, legally they cannot proclaim gluten-free. But, Austin Eastciders' cider is gluten-free!

Five Takeaways From the **New Austin Music Census**

2022 survey shows musicians moving farther from CITY COTE BY CHAD SWIATECKI

The latest appraisal of Austin's music economy shows that the city's prized cultural hallmark is in flux and unquestionably feeling the squeeze caused by boomtown growth.

The data and findings come from the Greater Austin Music Census 2022, an update of a 2014 effort that for the first time showed empirically that local musicians were legion but struggling to keep up with the cost of living in the Live Music Capital. The new census was conducted gratis by Sound Music Cities, the consulting group founded by Don Pitts, the former head of the city's music office who commissioned the initial census when he was still working in

Just over 2,200 musicians and music industry participants completed the online survey that was open for two months last summer, reflecting a 43% decrease from the almost 4,000 replies in 2014. Those responses show a music scene that is diversifying in terms of the types of jobs and performance opportunities

and around City Hall.

available locally, but with undeniable challenges remaining in terms of the likelihood of sticking it out long-term in the Austin area. Find some of the most noteworthy conclusions to draw from an early run through the 87-page, chart-heavy report below.

Affordability Bites: For anyone who's been comatose for the past decade, the census serves as a clear wake-up call that Austin's growth and affordability crisis is having a corrosive effect on its music and creative community. Thirty-eight percent of respondents said they are struggling to afford housing, with 36% saying they plan to leave the Austin area in the next three years. Affordability has been the buzzword du jour in political and civic circles for years now, and the census puts another exclamation point on the problem by showing how the lack of affordable housing is squashing the hopes of local musicians.


Outer City Limits: The overall musical exodus from the area means more musicians living farther away from Downtown Austin, with a rough average of 11 miles' distance from respondents' homes to what used to be the center of music and cultural activity. The city's 10 central ZIP codes saw residency of survey respondents decline by 12%, while out-of-county areas (San Marcos, Pflugerville, Manor) saw an increase of 7.7%. In short, Austin musicians are becoming Central Texas musicians, with venues and performance opportunities showing a small move away

> from the city core (the 78704 ZIP code specifically) and toward new growth areas in the south and east.

No Data on Dollars: While the affordability info paints a clear picture of the dire financial straits faced by Austin musicians, the lack of specific questions about annual earnings from music does somewhat defang the

findings. The 2014 census had an easy and loud reference point that almost one-third of Austin musicians earned \$15,000 or less per year. The lack of a follow-up inquiry on that matter means there's no opportunity to do an apples-to-apples comparison of earning power that could have easily resonated with the general public.

Aging Trend: The census shows an undeniable increase in middle-aged and senior respondents compared to data from 2014, indicating younger adults could be becoming more rare in the Austin music community overall. The 25-to-39 cohort dropped from half of all respondents to 38%, with those age 40-54 and age 65 and over showing single-digit increases. That trend suggests the area's music industry is likely to shrink in the coming decades unless there's a substantial change of

Eyes on Inclusion: One of the most noteworthy new features of the census was the polling on 14 diversity, equity, and inclusion matters. Those responses painted a mixed picture, where concerns over ageism, sexism, and elitism are the clearest concerns. Analysts within the report noted that minority groups tended to view the treatment of their community more harshly, adding even more friction and likely reducing opportunities among those groups.

At several points, the results note mixed returns with how the music scene has rebounded or struggled following the complete shutdown of live performances during the COVID-19 pandemic, which caused the cancellation of South by Southwest 2020 and dealt a major blow to the creative economy. Those financial challenges have added even more urgency to musicians' increasing flight from the city center, said James Russell, executive director of Trail of Lights and frequent advisor to local politicos on matters surrounding the creative economy. Russell said the out-migration creates a need for Austin to work with surrounding communities such as Lockhart and Bastrop to create venues and opportunities for musicians looking to stay within Central Texas.

"As the exodus from Austin continues with folks seeking a cheaper cost of living and quality of life, the surrounding communities have a huge opportunity to learn from the data that has been compiled and figure out how to embrace the folks that are coming to their communities from Austin. Be it sound ordinances or land development codes, they can learn from things that we've been chasing our tail on by having policies necessary to preserve the culture early on and not have to play catch up."

The affordability issues shown in the new music census results back up recent analysis by the nonprofit group Housing Opportunities for Musicians and Entertainers, which aids musicians 55 and older in the Austin area with their housing needs. Hanna Cofer, president of HOME, said 22% of its grant recipients now live outside of the city limits, with 50% reporting they earn less than \$1,500 per month including Social Security. She said spreading music-specific resources around the five-county region would likely have more impact than trying to preserve venues and other resources in the city core that is becoming prohibitively expensive.

Newly elected Mayor Kirk Watson said he hopes to use the census results while working to build support for the music community. In a prepared statement he said, "Austin music has long been essential to the character of our city, but we know that the people behind that music are struggling with the same affordability emergency that's affecting families throughout our community. The findings of the music census underscore the urgency of addressing our affordability issues to ensure interesting, innovative, and creative folks can continue to make magic here."

Executive producer Margaret Comeaux told the Chronicle: "The folks from the Moody Center reached out to us. and we were off to the races. AUSTIN PSYCH FEST turns back the clock, reviving its classic name and format as an all-inone-place festival running April 28-30 at the Far Out Lounge. 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

Getting to the Point

When two old souls meet an Italian drummer twice their age by GARY LINDSEY

Since 1987, a simple red cursive sign has declared 2928 Guadalupe St. to be a subcultural ground zero, not just for Austin blues, but for music collectors around the world. Walking into Antone's Record Shop, a Bukka White poster inches away from the latest Spoon release tells that you're in the right place to personally connect with Austin's history as a music city. Trying to fill 6,000 square feet with a profitable variety, there's no room for the historically petty tribal politics of music - country vs. blues, rock vs. hip-hop, alternative vs. mainstream.

All of that goes out the window, the only feud being doors open vs. doors closed.

Homegrown prodigy rockers the Point likewise practice such genre agnosticism, squeezed among the stacks last month at Antone's to promote their new EP, Berto's Banquet. On keys, Joe Roddy wore a plumbers jumpsuit with his first name above the pocket while conspirator Jack Montesinos took guitar in camo pants. With drummer Alberto Telo in between, and many more decades down the line, the trio breezed by a surprising wealth of catalog material to play their new platter.

Prior, 2020 sophomore iHOP soundtracked a sunny Sunday drive à la Air's Moon Safari, while 2021 follow-up Phonkadelic - an homage to DJ Screw and Houston hip-hop confidently grew into a smokey lounge at midnight. With their latest release, citing Texas psych, Peruvian chicha, and dub, Point front-line Montesinos and Roddy seem to have matured overnight, like a schoolmate returning from basic training as a full-grown adult. Which makes perfect sense considering that the two were still in high school when they began the project, releasing their first album, You're Just a *Dream*, in 2019.

"I took a break from playing live music in high school, just to make beats," Montesinos shares about the early days of collaboration with Roddy, who he has known since junior high.

Hearing a 21-year-old talk about taking a break from playing live during their teen years, one could easily imagine the common tale of frustrated young artists trying to be taken seriously in a cutthroat industry. Quite the contrary. Both Montesinos' and Roddy's résumés tell the story of an Austin hall-of-famer, rather than the tale of two twentysomethings just beginning their careers.

Roddy is the only son of Austin rockabilly rovalty Ted Roddy, whose biannual Elvis tribute, the King Conjure Orchestra, has been electrifying Austin audiences since 1986. At the age of 12, Roddy first took the stage on trumpet for "Suspicious Minds" with the group. "I was not very good at trumpet yet ... but I was really trying my best," he grins.

Montesinos began even earlier, when his father would protectively take him to hang with Austin's heaviest of hitters at the Historic Victory Grill's Monday blues nights at, remarkably, just 10 years old.

"My dad would have to carry my amp; it was too heavy," Montesinos laughs.

Antone's Records co-owner Eve Monsees also has the unique experience of playing Austin clubs as a teenager, often with schoolmate Gary Clark Jr. At the in-store gig. she reflected on first seeing Montesinos play the clubs as a preteen. "It was really apparent that he just had it," she told the Chronicle. "He just had the feel, and he understood when to play, and when not to play, how to attack certain notes. He just instantly figured it out."

But after years of playing Austin hot spots under the watchful eye of their supportive parents, the two became understandably bored with playing the music of their elders. Fortunately, just as their fertile minds entered high school, the duo discovered hiphop and shifted focus from Albert King and

nowhere to go, the boys explored new beats and melancholic tones fitting for universal malaise. Like so many, isolation gave them a renewed appreciation for live performance and the unique intimacy of ripping through a great hook with other talented musicians.

Come 2021, it was time to get their groove back, and Montesinos had the perfect candidate. An Italian immigrant with a wonderfully thick accent, Alberto Telo has been playing drums in Austin since he arrived

To which Montesinos adds: "Once we started to record the album, we knew he was the one."

Berto's Banquet sounds like a band ready to play. Trading in their GarageBand app for a garage rock sound, "Shackled" builds ideally toward a simple yet fiery lead, which is becoming Montesinos' signature. The bossa nova-touched, yet still driving, "Double Oh Seven" follows. If the Doors' Ray Manzarek were still alive to hear this song, he would immediately call up Robby Krieger and say, "Hey man, I really feel like jammin'."

Standout "Caesar's Malice," sounding like a Clash warmup, catches you off guard with dark reggae, while "Baby Blu" presents the Point's affectionate interpretation of a song by rapper/chef Action Bronson with Chance the Rapper. After building to the frenetic, feverish leads on "Pet Gun," the album just as quickly restores your regular heart rate with instrumental "Shleepy," the perfect digestif for this seven-course meal.

Armed with good hooks and good humor, Berto's Banquet is anything but a final course for the twosome.

"At this point we're having fun doing what we're doing," says Montesinos. "We're just gonna keep doing what we want."

Roddy, with a gentle fortitude, addresses the topic a bit more directly.

"This is our life. This is my life."

EVE MONSEES ON JACK MONTESINOS

Scotty Moore to Roni Size and A Tribe Called Quest. Tired of tuning instruments and carrying gear, Roddy and Montesinos put down their amps and picked up their phones.

Suddenly, all of that music theory procured firsthand was channeled into making new beats and atmospheric grooves on GarageBand.

"A lot of the stuff on iHOP and You're Just a Dream, we didn't think of it to play live. Just a lot of layers and having fun." Roddy explains.

In a perfectly timed move, just as Montesinos and Roddy were diving deep into the production of this new style, COVID-19 came in and wiped out live music completely. Left with an exciting new sound and here, seeking adventure, in 1996. Telo and Montesinos built a familiarity from crossing musical paths for years, on one stage or another, in the blues scene.

Although on paper the 56-year-old might seem like a strange choice for two collegiates just starting to get serious about a future in music, when it hits, it hits. So much so that the childhood friends felt compelled to name their new release after him, as Berto's Banquet. The EP followed a summer of winning new fans by launching fresh, adventurous sounds in matured Austin venues like C-Boy's and the Continental Club.

"Alberto has a very distinctive sound that you cannot find anywhere else," Roddy asserts.

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BLUSHING

Tether/Weak (Kanine)

With last year's Possessions deservedly shifting shoegazers Blushing from local indie rock heroes to buzzing risers of the international underground scene, their release cycle turns to the inevitable - and welcome reissue of their back catalog. While the band's 2019 debut album remains frustratingly unavailable outside of the digital realm, the double married couples' current

label Kanine has instead re-released the group's two early EPs as a colored vinyl twofer. Originally self-released in 2016, Tether showcases the dreamier side of Blushing's persona. On "Mess." "Why Can't We?" and the title track, guitarists Michelle Soto and Noe Carmona spin diaphanous waves of jangly shimmer, putting bassist Christina Carmona's introvertive voice at the center of the arrangements. "Protect You" adds muscle, as drummer Jake Soto gives his kit a good thrashing and the guitars paint with crunge. Blushing expands their reach further on 2018's Weak - where the eponymous opening cut strikes just the right balance of ear caress and speaker damage, accompanying one of their poppiest melodies to date. "Hidden Places" and "Bound" add a sense of anthemic determination to the arsenal, while "Love You Twice" and the accurately titled "Bliss" mix all their colors on one palette and come up Monet. Moving from the only slightly tentative Tether to the unobtrusively confident Weak, the band constitutes a traditionalist but superbly crafted shoegaze aesthetic, which it's been honing diligently ever since. Proof that Blushing's vision was intact from the start, just waiting for the world to catch up. - Michael Toland

Garcia (Remixed)

Thanks to her parents, Austinbased Leah Chisholm has been a Deadhead since before birth. Destiny would see her feed those jam band legends to the new gen, but only after earning a Berklee jazz piano performance degree. When she untangled that intellectualization to make house music, deserved plaudits for her chops arrived in spades. A hurricane of energy behind the decks as she plays keys live, the label owner and producer's work is big, bright, and uplifting. Giobbi scintillates with boom and bouncy bass, a calling card as much as her piano



house sound. Often dressed in vintage Grateful Dead tees, she noticed her fans did the same, though admitted to never having heard any songs by the band. They'd come close, as Giobbi previously mixed the Dead's music into her sets while streaming daily on Twitch and hosting on Sirius XM - enough to get invited to Playing in the Sand festival and now, to remix Jerry Garcia's first solo album, Garcia, for its 50th anniversary. Joined sometimes by Le Chev and DJ Tennis, the remixes keep the late songwriter's vocals, and his slide and steel twang. Effort highlight "Late for Supper," variously billed as the original album's low point, adapts to left-field greatness via layered space disco. "Sugaree" overprocesses the vox, but otherwise twinkles with the organic warmth of a DJ Koze track. "The Wheel" soars and chimes, reflecting the original material's metallic instrumentation. Garcia (Remixed) respectfully tempers Giobbi's usual bombast to match the honoree's tone. Deadheads born in another time, after all, might have been ravers. - Christina Garcia

ELI JOSEF FEBRUARY RESIDENCY

Hole in the Wall, Wednesday 8 (w/ Yonah B, Hanover, Lola Tried)

Like the subject of their most-listened-to song on Spotify, the spotlight shines on the band behind "I Love You Aubrev Plaza." Each Wednesday this month. Eli Josef will put on a show at Hole in the Wall. When the five young guys started the band in 2019, they primarily steered down the alt-rock route, avoiding stereotypical self-pity with conversational charisma. Some songs are romantic and daydreamy, but the defining feature of their discography is an undercurrent of humor that stands out among the large pool of Austin indie rockers.



Each of the San Marcos-born group's four sets at the West Campus staple highlight a different era of their music. To ring off February, Eli Josef performed songs from the band's first experimental indie album, Grocery Store. Their second set will feature songs from the 2021 post-COVID Doomsday Disco, which sticks to upbeat instrumentals and funny but satirical, existential words. After a cowboy-themed third set with songs from a forthcoming new album, the final show will be a greatest hits night.

Eli Josef's eclectic catalog makes for easy listening, but their high-energy and slightly theatrical live sets provide an even better backdrop. With a sonic goal of making something enjoyable to themselves, lead singer Eli Jacobsen remarks that the residency "means a lot to us, and we hope it brings as much enjoyment to someone out there." JACKIE VENSON

Waterloo Records, Friday 3

After a blistering guitar solo went viral on TikTok, all eyes are on Austin native Jackie Venson. It's a good time to capitalize at the Austin American-Statesman's new free concert series, the Drop. Evolution of Joy, a re-release of her 2019 album Joy, dropped January 27, featuring robust, fullband versions of the originals that take her expressive, bluesy guitar licks to even greater heights. Venson marks the occasion with a performance and record signing at Waterloo, with the all-ages show serving as a double celebration: Venson also turns 33, and she's bringing a birthday cake to share with the - Abby Johnston

KOOP BIRTHDAY BASH W/ BROWNOUT

Antone's, Saturday 4

Bittersweet birthday, somewhat, for KOOP, given last week's passing of foundational figure Rod Moag. The homepage of 91.7FM Austin Community Radio calls the late scholar, musician, and deejay "an integral part of KOOP since day one." Since orchids mark anniversaries reaching 28, love, luxury, strength, and beauty hopefully signal 2023 for the homegrown culture beacon, Grupo Fantasma's spinoff Brownout makes this a pachanga, the local Latin guitar crew putting a fine point on any performance. Moag's beloved Lone Star sound tributes KOOP's Texan focus in veteran Austin two-step machine Hot Texas Swing Band. Much to celebrate, anticipate, and wake. - Raoul Hernandez

EL COMBO OSCURO, ORGANIZACIÓN KUMBIAMBERA Chess Club. Saturday 4

Fusing Peruvian Sixties psychedelic and loose rhythmic Latin, El Combo Oscuro highlights a night of cumbia at Chess Club. Last year the local sextet released Cumbia Capital, a mezcal-fermented brew of slinky keyboard modulations, polyrhythmic percussion, and serpentine surf rock. An extension of Que Sonido Tan Rico (2021), the four-track EP unravels into a peyote hypnosis as sinewy-limbed six-strings uncoil ("El Ventarron") and organs cut loose, swirling into zigzagged flourishes. Expect more cumbia and Tejano classics by fellow locals Organización Kumbiambera and Las Chicas en 512. - Aleiandra Ramirez

WILLIS ALAN RAMSEY

Saxon Pub. Saturday 4 & Sunday 5

We've been promised a sophomore album now for decades, but over 50 years after Willis Alan Ramsey delivered his iconic eponymous debut (and only) LP, the songwriter still captivates. Joining Jimmy Buffett onstage in Austin last year to sing his "Ballad of Spider John," Ramsey's voice proved preserved but deepened with wisdom, as do the new songs he'll be offering over two nights at the Saxon alongside his oft-covered classics like "Satin Sheets" and "Muskrat Candlelight" (i.e., "Muskrat Love"). The onetime local helped put Austin songwriting on the map in the Seventies, and the city continues to return the favor to help prime his reemergence. - Doug Freeman

MOM ROCK, VISION ARCADE, GOLDEN DAYS

The Ballroom, Wednesday 8

Formed in a Boston dorm and relocated locally for the time being, alternative powerhouse Mom Rock caravans to the Ballroom for their live Austin debut. Dubbed Rolling Stone's Hot Band of 2022, the threeperson antithesis boasts sleek baseball uniforms and music fest spots (ahem, South by Southwest and the Rock Boat) alongside a delightful mastery of pop-rock bliss. On December EP Bases Loaded, Mom Rock coolly melds Aughts-Killers rumble with 2019-Wallows power-pop. The result yields 11 minutes of deceptively optimistic croons backed by fuzzy jangles and thumping hooks. Vision Arcade primes with cascading blues/ alt-rock, and Golden Days open with hazy Petrichor.







Ronald Edwin Erwin, 65, of Austin, Texas, passed away on January 22, 2023, after a brief battle with cancer. Ron was a longtime fixture in the vibrant Austin music community, an always smiling warm presence behind the drum kit for countless bands and artists. He was a good drummer and an even better guy, someone who made everybody else sound better in his understated way, always with the rhythm, a wry smile, and once off stage, a joke and a lively chat.

Ron was born in Hobbs, New Mexico on April 30, 1957, the third of four children growing up on a farm. Donna, Dickie Lee, Belinda, and Ron also did their share of farm work along with their parents Ralph Edwin Erwin and Wilda Jean Dukes (who's still with us at 91)

Ron had an art teacher named Colville Jones whose influence would last the rest of his life,

as he pursued both music and visual art as his greatest passions. Roy Showalter got him into drumming, asking teenaged Ron to play drums for Miss New Mexico pageant. When he was too young to play in bars, his mother would go with him to help her boy fulfill his dream. Ron was hooked, and he would spend many of the next fifty years behind a kit.

But that wasn't all. After graduating from Hobbs High School in 1975, Ron joined the popular touring Up with People show and had a blast. During that same time, Ron studied art at the University of Arizona in Tucson.

After working for his father's oil company in Hobbs, Ron moved to Austin to pursue his artistic passions in a like-minded city. He worked at Country Store Gallery, painted, and began making Austin music. Ron found himself playing with a number of Texas' finest musicians: Walter Hyatt, Tracy Lynn, James Hand, Butch Hancock, Karen Abrahams, and his friend, legendary songwriter, Sonny Throckmorton.

With Champ Hood, Marvin Dykhuis, Dave Heath, and Jimmie Dale Gilmore, he was in what Champ liked to call "the best band I never had "What Champ meant was that the Threadgill Troubadours, who held down every Wednesday night at the legendary Threadgill's Old No. 1 restaurant in Austin, never rehearsed or planned anything. They just showed up together each week and let the music unfold magically, organically, naturally. It was a magical time and place, and Ron held down the rhythm with nothing more than brushes, a single snare drum, and that wry smile. He played a reunion gig of the Threadgill's extended family of musicians just eight weeks ago at the Saxon Pub.

Aside from it being his natural good-natured way, the smile was also a reflection of the joy he had knowing that his little girl Olivia was right down front watching her daddy play. Ron was a

proud and loving father. Those Wednesdays led Olivia to become a musician herself, playing the fiddle like Champ Hood did.

When those days ended. Ron just kept on making music in other settings, as he did with the Troubadillos for many a night at Poodie's Roadhouse. His brother Dickie Lee Erwin was also making music of his own all along in the music town that loved the Erwin family. The feeling was mutual. Ron's music also took him far outside of Austin, even to Europe, which he loved. Beyond painting, drumming, and being a dad, Ron was also a skilled handyman, a supportive caretaker to those in need, and a dear friend to so many.

Ron got his coolest title on July 14, 2020, the day that Olivia gave birth to his granddaughter Delaney Jean Brown. Ron Erwin is survived by Delaney and her parents Olivia and Corey Brown
