FROM MENTORSHIP TO PAY: SMART SOLUTIONS TO THE TEACHER SHORTAGE

A few weeks ago at an H-E-B, I ran into an old co-worker who taught next door to me when we were both starting out in education. For five years, we worked on the same campus at a Title I charter school in Austin. Claire was the reason I wanted to become a better teacher. I can't count the number of times I watched her take command of a classroom, talk a student out of dropping out, or speak to parents on the phone in the evenings. I knew Claire as a driven, intelligent, innovative, and compassionate educator: what it takes to be a great teacher.

In the H-E-B, among the hordes of 5pm Sunday shoppers, we exchanged casual niceties, and then she broke the news about leaving the profession this past summer.

Sad as it is, Claire's departure from the classroom is nothing out of the ordinary. Last year alone, Austin's school district lost over 2,000 teachers, nearly double that of the previous year. According to recent surveys, upwards of 70% of the cur-BY MATTHEW rent AISD teachers are considering leaving after this year. And while there are many reasons behind the uptick of teacher resignations, salary is at the top of the list. "I can't afford to

pay my rent, buy groceries, and still go out on a date with my boyfriend once or twice a month," Claire told me. "I loved the work. But I should be able to afford to buy a home at some point. I should be able to afford to send my kids to a decent college."

With rising costs of living and high inflation, it's little wonder that many schools in the district, including mine, are experiencing understaffing. While efforts to raise the base salary of teachers by 4% went into effect, that increase doesn't match the rate of inflation. And while AISD does pay a teacher salary above the state average, that base salary falls well short of every other major metro area in our state. However, with the upcoming legislative session, and the recent passage of all three of AISD's bond proposals - totaling over \$2.4 billion in money to go to school renovations, technology, buses, new schools, and more – there is opportunity for change.

One way Texas legislatures can address the teacher shortage crisis is to expand the Mentor Program Allotment that was established with [House Bill] 3. With more money going toward teacher mentorship programs, districts like Austin will be better equipped to retain and compensate quality teachers through paid stipends while at the same time providing more hands-on, one-on-one training and assistance to those who are new to the profession and are most at risk of "teacher burnout."

Another avenue to explore is investing in teacher access to high-quality instructional materials. In the life of any teacher I've ever known, weekends, holidays, and late nights are too often spent modifying or creating from scratch curricular materials. Having access to quality materials, coupled with effective training on how

> to integrate these into one's curriculum, will save teachers time and energy on a daily level.

> Most importantly though, legislators this year can vote to increase the basic allotment schools receive per pupil, and with that, require schools to apply

that added funding toward an increase in teacher salaries. Reports show Texas ranking below the national average on teacher salary averages, and 43rd in the nation in terms of yearly pay increases. Raising the basic allotment could be a feasible solution.

Now is a real opportunity for change. Like Claire said, "The work I do is challenging and impactful and essential. I deserve the basics."



WHAT ARE THREE UT STUDENTS AND 100 GRAND?

Four seasons after their first appearances as teen contestants, three UT students will return for a Jeopardy! High School Reunion Tournament. The wiz kids, now wiz twentysomethings, will compete for a \$100,000 grand prize in a series beginning Feb. 20. See senior biology major Alison Purcell Feb. 21, senior mechanical engineering student Rohan Kapileshwari Feb. 27, and junior public health major Anish Maddipoti Feb. 28.

THIS IS JEOPARDY! (BUT LITERALLY THOUGH) KUT reported this week that pregnant Texans on Medicaid face logistical nightmares seeking prenatal treatment. Although the federal health insurance program covers about half of all births in the state, those on Medicaid are more likely to be rejected by a hospital, while minorities on Medicaid experience providers with low cultural competency, among other dire consequences.

NOW ENTERING THE STUDIO IS TODAY'S DEFENDANT

Attorney General Ken Paxton has agreed to apologize and pay \$3.3 million to four whistleblowers whom he improperly fired after they accused him of bribery and abuse of office. The A.G. is still under FBI investigation for those charges, though this settlement ends the lawsuit over ousting top deputies. Paxton also faces an ongoing felony indictment for suspected securities fraud related to his private business deals in 2011.

WHAT IS FORMING A UNION? Testa employees in Buffalo, N.Y., are forming a union, Tesia Workers United. They "want Tesla to be the company [they] know it can be." We'll see if Austin Tesla employees follow suit.

WHAT IS INEFFECTUAL STAFFING? Advocacy nonprofit **Disability Rights Texas** is requesting the **Texas** Education Agency to investigate Austin ISD's waitlist to evaluate students with special education services. In a letter, they ask the TEA to appoint a "conservator or management team" for the special education department. Staff shortages (only 1 in 3 roles are filled) led to a backlog of 800 students awaiting initial evaluations.

WHAT IS THE LIVE MUSIC CAPITAL OF THE WORLD?

In a city lauded worldwide for live music, one might think a duo of unanimous Council votes to adopt changes to the **land use code** to support more concert venues would begin in earnest sooner than six months after passage. Think again. The city has barely made progress on changing the code, and **Economic Development Department** staff say it'll take another six months.

WHAT IS SHELTER FROM THE STORM? In response to the recent ice storm, Council has directed the city manager (now Jesús Garza) to reevaluate how extreme weather shelters operate during emergencies. Of special importance, city staff should identify barriers that homeless Austinites face getting into these shelters.

HELTER SHELTER

Dear Editor,

Your article about the city's response to the winter storm ["Walking on Thin Ice," News, Feb. 10] says that most City Council members think the greatest shortcoming in the response was poor communication. The more important shortcoming was the lack of adequate shelter for people without power. That is a potential life or death situation. Families with children were turned away from shelter. Registration for shelter required everyone to travel Downtown between 6 and 8pm during freezing temperatures and hazardous road conditions. Opening a few libraries during business hours was not sufficient; more complete shelters were not established until the Monday after the storm.

The city had two years since the last major storm to set up shelters. They have made some progress, but there is no excuse for not having shelters set up during this extreme event. There need to be shelters around the city that have back-up generators or solar and batteries. Some people can afford to stay in hotels (if they have space and power) or have relatives they can stay with, but

many people don't. The city should create a list of vulnerable people that includes seniors and people with disabilities who do not have someone in town who can help them. That was also discussed by the Council but never completed.


The Council passed a resolution last Thursday to address extreme weather shelters. It has some good recommendations, but it was drafted prior to the storm, and its focus is on the unhoused population. Shelter for the unhoused definitely needs to be improved, but when you have hundreds of thousands of people without power, that requires a whole different level of shelter; and that was not specifically addressed in the resolution.


The city needs to make this a priority and get it done before next winter.

D.A. Charges Cop in Beating of Handcuffed Man, Displeasing Lawyers Who Rep APD

D.A. responds: You want a hearing? Let's make it public.

The sparring continues between District Attorney José Garza and his perennial critics, attorneys Ken Ervin and Doug O'Connell. On Feb. 7, Garza used an unusual legal filing called an "information" to charge Austin police Officer Alejandro Gaitan with aggravated assault for the beating and tasing of a man in handcuffs during a 2021 arrest. In response, Ervin and O'Connell complained that Garza had sidestepped the grand jury process, saying the D.A. "intends to criminally charge police officers at any cost."

An information is a court document that a district attorney can use to charge a person with crimes without getting an indictment from a grand jury. Garza told local media outlets that he still intends to submit the case to a grand jury but decided to charge Gaitan now to preserve the option of prosecuting the officer in the future, because the two-year statute of limitations on aggravated assault expires in March.

Body-camera video of the beating of Carvius Jackson is not yet available (the Chronicle has submitted a public information request for it) but it is described in a pair of disciplinary memos evaluating the conduct of the officers who arrested Jackson on March 12, 2021. The memos state that as

three officers attempted to take Jackson into custody for an outstanding warrant, Gaitan rushed up and began beating him on the spine with a collapsible baton. After the officers got Jackson in handcuffs Gaitan tased him three times.

With Jackson in custody, two of the officers - Eric Perez and Katherine Alzola - turned off their body cameras to discuss the incident, presumably to get their stories straight. Their subsequent reports left out Gaitan's beating and tasing of Jackson. Chief Joseph Chacon suspended Perez and Alzola for 90 days each, one of the most serious examples of discipline we've seen from the chief.

When asked if Chacon believed that charging Gaitan was appropriate, a spokesperson for the department said that APD leadership immediately investigated the use of force after learning about it. "APD respects the criminal justice process, has fully cooperated with the investigation, and will continue to do so," the spokesperson said.

Gaitan stands accused of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, assault with bodily injury, and official oppression. Ervin and O'Connell, who represent many of the APD officers Garza has charged with assault and murder since he took office, have

consistently accused the D.A. of "improper political motivations" - charging officers with crimes to advance his political career. They also accuse him of manipulating the evidence he submits to grand juries to secure indictments. They asked District Court Judge Chantal Eldridge on Feb. 7 to compel Garza to record any presentation he makes to a grand jury in Gaitan's case, including "instruction on the law, advice on legal questions, and any summation or argument made by the prosecuting attorney." Eldridge granted the request and ordered the D.A. to make an audio recording of these proceedings.

The next day. Garza responded with his own motion, saying that the D.A.'s Office would

not object if Ervin and O'Connell requested an "examining trial" - a trial before a judge that would force the D.A. to show the evidence he has against Gaitan. This, presumably, would be the same evidence Garza would present to any grand jury impaneled to examine Gaitan's beating of Jackson. Garza's invitation served as a dare, because if Ervin and O'Connell requested an examining trial, the evidence against Gaitan - almost certainly containing body-camera footage - would be publicly known, unlike in a secretive grand iury investigation. Such a trial would shift the focus from the charging process to Gaitan's conduct. The attorneys have not yet publicly responded to Garza's invitation.

NEW LAW COULD ENABLE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ACROSS TEXAS

If a school district is hoping to start bond renovations soon, the timing isn't ideal. The Texas Permanent School Fund's \$117 billion Bond Guarantee Program only has \$26 million remaining to guarantee school bonds. So districts are more likely to see high interest rates and lower renovation funds without an active guarantor program. Across Texas, 44 districts – including Austin, Lake Travis, and Pflugerville – were denied guaranteed bonds because of the PSF limit in 2022. In November, only \$3.5 billion remained in the program, compared to the \$15 billion in bonds that 61 school districts proposed. The good news is a bill in Washington, D.C., could axe the limit altogether.

U.S. Rep. **Lloyd Doggett**, D-Austin, filed the Keeping Texas School Construction Costs Down Act (H.R. 32) in early January with co-author Rep. Jodey Arrington, R-Lubbock. If it's passed, school districts will still be required to have insurance behind their bonds to show investors, but there won't be a risk of losing the PSF as a guarantor. And the legislation won't cost the state any money. If it fails to pass and the Bond Guarantee Program runs out of funding, the Texas Education Agency estimates that Texas school districts will spend \$425 million in financing costs and interest rates.

The Texas PSF was created in 1854 with \$2 million (about \$71 million in 2023 dollars) and is currently managed by the State Board of Education and the **Texas General Land Office**. The diversified investment portfolio supports public and charter schools, and allows school districts to get AAA **bond ratings** when they go to market, which gets them the lowest interest rates and consequently more funds to use for renovations of school campuses, new equipment purchases, or electric school buses.

After a year and a half of communication with the federal government and trying to rally Texas lawmakers to pressure the Treasury Department to extend or remove the limits to the program, Rep. Doggett says the **Internal** Revenue Service hasn't reached a conclusion. "Texas schools and Texas voters deserve nothing less than an immediate fix to this school finance issue - so our taxpayer dollars go as far as possible to serve our students," he said. So far, there's no opposition to the bill.

Austin ISD Chief Financial Officer **Ed Ramos** told the *Chronicle* in November that he thought the IRS would have intervened by now and that the district would move forward with its renovation projects without a guaranteed bond. Now, AISD has no choice but to do so and plans to start projects funded by the 2022 bond this year. - Madi Donham

dismiss City Manager Cronk (on a 10-1 vote, with Natasha Harper-Madison opposed), Council also voted not to consider the fouryear police contract that city staff had just finished negotiating with the police union, and instead pursue a one-year renewal of the current contract, with an eve to starting up new negotiations after the May public vote on the Austin Police Oversight Act.

Both were part of the same decision, as Cronk had pretty much staked his job on the four-year contract, and a large Council majority had run for office on a promise to be tougher in negotiating police oversight. But there are a lot of unknowns here - starting with whether an untenable number of police officers will opt to resign in a few days and whether the union will agree to the one-year extension. and ending with the legality and enforceability of the proposed APOA itself. Acting City Manager Jesús Garza isn't as much of a question mark - he seems unlikely to have an agenda of his own, but he also isn't the guy this activist council wants leading the city into the future, so there's a long and possibly contentious job search on tap there. And a lot of opportunity for the status quo to tighten its grip on the city bureaucracy while this new council is still trying to find the bathrooms.

But like I said, we'll be back next week either way.

Doggett Gets Funding for Texas State University Climate Change Research

U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, has secured a second round of federal appropriations, to the tune of \$2.48 million, for the **Meadows Center for Water and the Environment** at Texas State University to study the effects of climate change on Texas water resources. The funds, which add to an initial \$2 million investment Doggett obtained last year, will advance the next phase of a three-to-five-year study "developing actionable projections for how climate change is impacting our water." said Doggett in a press release last week. Dr. Robert Mace, the Meadows Center's executive director, will lead the research along with Ph.D. students at Texas State.

"As academics, we can't advocate for solutions. But what we can do is provide information and analysis to inform policymakers." says Mace. Currently this kind of research is "just not out there. There are some tiny watershed studies, some water utilities that have looked at climate change" - notably Austin Water. in the city's Water Forward Plan. "Our goal is to democratize access to that information." The study will produce a publicly available tool allowing regional water planners to build climate impacts into their management plans.

The **Highland Lakes**, which supply much of Austin's drinking water, are experiencing record low inflows and increased evaporation, and Mace says surface water will continue having a declining yield due to rising temperatures, drought, and development. The largest Central Texas groundwater source, the Carrizo-Wilcox Aguifer, is now largely committed to industry, including Samsung's 11 planned semiconductor plants. Tesla factories, and Austin's ever-growing commuter ring. Projects that store water underground for future use, like Austin's Aguifer Storage and Recovery, are the kinds of solutions with promise, says Mace.

Last summer, when Doggett unveiled the initial investment. he was "not optimistic" about the Texas Legislature planning for the climate-driven water crisis. Despite the Lege's new bipartisan Water Caucus and GOP committee chairs such as Sen. Charles **Perry**, R-Lubbock, publicly acknowledging the prospect of future water scarcity, Mace still doesn't expect much climate change planning in Texas at the moment. "But that may change with time, and it probably will change with time. We want to provide tools for those that want to plan for climate change today, but also for those that maybe [will] five years from now. If one day the Legislature wakes up and goes, 'Holy cow, we need to do something about climate change' ... they'll have a playbook - Lina Fisher ready to go."

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

SO LONG CRONK

After dramatic days of extreme weather and backstabbing. Council lets the city manager go by Austin Sanders

After five years on the job, City Manager Spencer Cronk had worn out his welcome with most City Council members, and with a wide swath of the Austin community. Still, his firing Wednesday morning in a 10-1 vote may have come as a shock to some Austinites. It was only a few weeks ago that Council approved an 11% raise (from \$350,000 to \$388,000) for Cronk, who, in overseeing the city's day-to-day operations, wields more power than Austin's mayor.

Today, Feb. 16, is his last on the job. Former Austin City Manager Jesús Garza will take over as interim city manager while Council deliberates on how they should go about filling the job permanently. Garza, who served as city manager from 1994 to 2002, is an old Watson ally. They worked together during Watson's first mayoral term (1997-2001), and Garza co-chaired the Stand Together Austin PAC, which helped put Watson back in the mayor's office in 2022.

Before Council coalesced around the idea of ousting Cronk, one argument in favor of keeping him was that a sudden change in leadership could freeze progress on issues at City Hall. Typically, interim executives are placeholders discouraged from moving boldly on issues, because policymakers want the opportunity to vet the person charged with making big changes.

But Watson, along with the other new CMs elected to the dais, were elected on platforms promising big, bold change. It's a key priority for Watson, in particular, who will face reelection in 2024, because Austin voters approved a charter amendment in May 2021 to move mayoral elections to presidential election years. Placing Garza, who has a reputation as a competent city leader, could relieve some of these concerns. That said, when Garza led the city more than two decades ago, he had a much deeper bench of assistant city managers

and department directors. Filling those vacancies will be a key priority for Garza to fulfill the policy vision set by Council.

Garza, a bureaucrat whom Watson knows

and trusts, could also help Watson navigate his transition into the kind of mayor the Austin of 2023 needs. The city is much different, and the people living within it more diverse, than when Watson last occupied the mayor's office inside of City Hall.

At any rate, Watson made clear from the dais that he expects Garza to run the city differently than Cronk. "Let me be clear, we are not going to do our business like this. It stops today," Watson said after Council voted to terminate Cronk. "The outcomes are too important. We as a

Cronk did not offer any remarks from the dais, but issued a statement following the Council vote. "I serve at the pleasure of the Mayor and Council and acknowledge their decision," he said. "I stand proud of our

council want to help our community ... begin to hear each other and maybe even trust each other a little more than we did today."

organizational accomplishments under my tenure. I thank the Austin community for the opportunity to lead this great city, and I thank our City employees for their consistent commitment to providing the very best public service."

Council Member Natasha Harper-Madison, who was the only CM to vote against firing Cronk, explained her decision in a statement. "When I consider the depth and breadth of challenges our community is facing, I do not believe terminating the city manager is the most measured or reasonable decision at this time," Harper-Madison said. She voted no "because this action will not solve the systemic issues within our city government or our collective response to the recent winter storm."

HOW WE GOT HERE

Frustration with Cronk's leadership among CMs has ebbed and flowed over the past two years, and has varied depending on the CM in question. But most members have found at least one issue that they can track back to the city manager's office.

For some, frustrations with Cronk date back to 2020, when he stood behind former Austin police Chief Brian Manley despite calls from Council and community members to oust him. For others, frustrations swelled after Austin voters approved Proposition B in May 2021, which criminalizes homelessness by reinstating the city's ban on public camping. Some CMs wanted the city to move faster in enforcing the voter-approved ban, because since Council first loosened the restrictions on camping in 2019, it had become the most frequent constituent complaint delivered to Council offices.

> Failures at Austin Water and Austin Energy have also become an increasingly dire concern. The water utility has had to issue three boil water notices in four years, all of which occurred during Cronk's tenure. (And an audit presented to Council last month

struggled during Winter Storm Uri in 2021, though those issues were more related to failures at the state level. AE struggled again two weeks ago in their response to Winter Storm Mara, which resulted in unprecedented levels of ice accumulation on tree branches and power lines, causing thousands of AE customers to lose power for more than a week. Then, in the days after the ice storm, CMs took issue with a lack of communication from the city during the extreme weather.

More broadly, the city has struggled for the past two years to fill staffing vacancies in virtually every department that encompasses the vast city government. That has only exacerbated challenges the city faces. As middle managers and directors of departments continued to leave the city over the past year, and as they communicated their concerns to CMs, some on Council have seen Cronk's failure of leadership as a root problem.

Is it fair to lay the blame for all of these issues at the feet of one person? Probably not, but Cronk is the chief executive of the huge enterprise that is the city of Austin government. His responsibilities are vast, but so is his compensation. And, as the old adage says, the buck stops with him. When failures occur at any organization, the responsibility ultimately falls at the feet of that organization's chief executive. If failures continue to stack up, it's only a matter of time before questions begin to arise about that chief executive's leadership abilities.

Which is where Cronk found himself last week with Council's 11 members, who have the authority to fire him. Their various frustrations with the functioning of city government extend beyond decisions made – or not made – over the past week, but Cronk's handling of the ice storm and police contract negotiations created a boiling point.


ACCELERATING TO A STOP

In the ongoing effort to renew the city's police contract with Austin's police union, a breakthrough finally came earlier this month. Friday, Feb. 3, CM Chito Vela announced a Council resolution that would direct city staff to negotiate a seemingly simple one-year contract extension with the Austin Police Association, to be voted on the following Thursday, Feb. 9. That extension would allow enough time for voters to weigh in on police oversight measures that will be on the ballot in May, so that a longer-term contract could meet those new requirements, should voters support them. But come Monday, after freezing days without power for many Austinites, Watson had announced that the Feb. 9 meeting would also include discussion of Cronk's job performance.

Since long before Winter Storm Mara. Cronk and much of Council have disagreed about how Cronk has managed, or not managed, the Austin Police Department, A year ago, when Travis County District Attorney José Garza announced indictments of 19 officers for alleged assaults of protesters during May 2020 Black Lives Matter demonstrations, Cronk said in a statement that he did not believe criminal indictments of the officers "working under very difficult circumstances" was "the correct outcome." That positioned him with Chief Joe Chacon, but against many Austinites and CMs. And Cronk's willingness to pay out multimillion-dollar settlements victims of police violence is costing the city real money.

After a protracted and confusing discussion of the short-term police contract extension on the dais Feb. 9, which saw Cronk resist the will of Council to an unprecedented degree, the item was ultimately postponed. This was a win for union leadership, who would much prefer to approve a four-year contract before the May election, because doing so would lock in a premium pay-and-benefits package and a weaker police oversight framework than would be required if Equity Action's Austin Police Oversight Act passes. Cronk is well aware of these dynamics, which makes the maneuvers he pulled off over the past few days all the more brazen.

the announcement, with a 9:30am press conference set for Thursday, Feb. 9, to spread the news.

Cronk's choice to announce that agreement Thursday morning – flouting the clearly expressed will of a Council poised to initiate a one-year extension hours later – turned what was an internal dispute into a scorched-earth conflict between the manager and his 11 bosses.

Why would Cronk rush this contract that Council didn't want? Cronk said the goal had always been to reach a deal in Feb. 26 date is just as important. They suspect that scores of officers worried about losing major retirement benefits would put in for retirement.

But ever since last September's Council decision to put Equity Action's ordinance on the ballot rather than adopting it from the dais – a move that frustrated justice advocates at the time – Council's will has been clear that it wouldn't approve a contract until after the May 6 election. In January we reported "near-universal agreement" among CMs that Council approve a

shorter contract extension. Surely Cronk knew this. (He may not read the *Chronicle*, but his comms staff does.)

Cronk's position is that some of the provisions in the Equity Action ordinance are not legally enforceable unless they're included in the police contract – something the APA has said it will never agree to. So he thinks the oversight measures in the tentative four-year deal are as good as we can get. Advocates agree there is some validity to Cronk's concern, but the ordinance includes a severability clause that would preserve its overall structure for civilian oversight; the city has doubts that will do the trick.

Crafting a robust civilian police oversight framework over the objections of the police union will always be challenging, but a city manager who is committed to that goal – as Cronk's spokespeople insisted he was – could work to achieve it at the bargaining table. Cronk decided to do something else, which is hard to see in any light other than an intentional effort to sandbag the Council.

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
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TIMELINE: HOW SPENCER CRONK LOST HIS JOB

- DEC. 2017 Spencer Cronk becomes city manager following a secretive search process.
- APR. 2018 Cronk names Brian Manley Ione finalist for APD chief, despite concerns from justice advocates that an internal hire won't be a change agent. City Council supports Manley's hiring.
- APR. 2020 A third-party report identifies a culture of bigotry and fear of retaliation within APD. This same month, Officer Christopher Taylor fatally shoots unarmed Michael Ramos, sparking protests.
- MAY 2020 As Council calls for police reform amid national protests over police violence, Cronk lays out plans for "reimagining public safety."
- JUNE 2020 Council approves a resolution that says they have "no confidence" in current APD leadership to change APD culture. Cronk refuses to demote or force Manley out, as advocates and Council demand.
- JULY 2020 Cronk proposes FY 2021 budget, which cuts \$8.1 million from APD's budget by eliminating a little over half of unfilled officer positions.
- AUG. 2020 City Council reviews Cronk's job performance over concerns about him stalling changes to APD leadership.
- MAY 2021 Voters approve Proposition B, which reinstates bans on public camping. Frustrations soon arise as the city delays implementation of the ordinance. They also vote down a "strong mayor" prop, keeping the power and responsibility of running city government within the city manager's office.
- FEB. 2022 Austin Water customers fall under the third boil water notice in four years.
- MAY 2022 Negotiations between the city and the Austin Police Association begin over a new police contract, to establish officer pay and civilian oversight.
- AUG. 2022 Equity Action's police oversight initiative petition garners enough signatures to land the Austin Police Oversight Act on the November ballot. Later this month, the city clerk fails to validate EA's petition in time for the fall election, pushing the measure to the May 2023 ballot.
- NOV. 2022 Austin elects Mayor Kirk Watson who, during his 1997-2001 term as mayor, helped negotiate the city's first police contract with APA and establish the Office of the Police Monitor. Cronk pushes for passage of a compromise contract before the new Council is sworn in. If successful, the new contract, with watered-down oversight, would supersede the APOA, delaying voter-approved oversight reforms until the next contract is negotiated in 2027.
- DEC. 2022 Voters for Oversight and Police Accountability collects signatures for a weaker alternative to the Austin Police Oversight Act, using deceptive campaign tactics; VOPA's campaign is almost entirely funded by the APA. Also this month, Council gives Cronk a raise, with CM Alison Alter expressing "deep concerns" about Cronk's performance.
- JAN. 2023 We report "near-universal agreement among CMs that Council should approve a one-year extension of the existing police contract," which would allow voters to weigh in on police oversight on the May ballot before the approval of a long-term contract.
- FEB. 3. 2023 CM Chito Vela unveils a Council resolution directing staff to negotiate a one-year contract extension.
- FEB. 6, 2023 Following criticisms of the city's handling of Winter Storm Mara. Council calls a special meeting to discuss Cronk's job performance.
- FEB. 9, 2023 In the morning, Cronk announces a tentative deal with APA on a four-year contract - flouting the intent of Council, which is set to vote on Vela's resolution that afternoon. During an executive session, Council agrees near-unanimously to ask for Cronk's resignation or fire him if he refuses.
- FEB. 15, 2023 Council votes 10-1 to fire Cronk.

When Council met in closed-door executive session on Feb. 9 following their decision to postpone a vote on the one-year contract extension item, it was clear that many CMs viewed the city manager's performance this way. The following day, Feb. 10, City Hall sources began to spread the word to reporters that consensus among CMs had been reached: Cronk had to go.

Friday afternoon, Watson and Mayor Pro Tem Paige Ellis met with Cronk to work out a deal that would

result in an amicable separation. Whether or not Cronk wanted to go, he saw the writing on the wall and knew that if he did not leave voluntarily, he would be fired. A handshake agreement was reached by the end of that meeting where Cronk would resign and Council would authorize a severance package to pay him what his 2018 contract stipulated he would be owed if he were ever fired.

But at some point between the end of that meeting and Saturday night, Cronk became concerned that his voluntary resignation would not ensure payment of his severance package. It would be possible, in theory, for Council to accept the city manager's resignation and then vote to deny him his severance benefits. That scenario would likely not have played out, but it is understandable for Cronk - given the highly acrimonious turn his relationship with Council had taken over the past 48 hours – to fear it as a possibility.

When, on Saturday, Feb. 11, an addendum to the Feb. 15 Council meeting agenda added an item that would enable Council to fire Cronk, he said in a statement, "I will simply reiterate that I remain Austin's City Manager and no actions have been taken by this new Mayor and Council to change my responsibilities or role." Then he doubled down on his stance on the police contract, saying the four-year agreement is "centered on my professional management experience of how best to keep our community safe - and that remains the sole driving factor for pursuing a four-year contract."

The mutual separation via resignation route was always viewed as the most beneficial for Cronk and the city. Firing the city manager is not going to help Council as they look to fill the job permanently, and getting fired is not going to help Cronk land a new job

IN SAN MARCOS, POLICE CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS ARE BACK ON

While the city of Austin has terminated its city manager partly over his handling of the forthcoming police contract, **San Marcos** is dealing with its own ongoing police contract negotiations.

Criminal justice advocates at Mano Amiga surprised themselves Feb. 7 by successfully pressuring the San Marcos City Council to cancel a recently approved police contract. The 4-3 vote means the contract, which had been criticized for failing to strengthen police accountability, will be renegotiated.

"Our team is both shocked and thrilled with the results of this evening's vote," said Sam Benavides, Mano Amiga's communications director. "But I think it speaks to just how reasonable our demands are. We've spent the last six months educating our community about what the demands mean and the role they've played in allowing cops to evade discipline when they inflict violence upon our neighbors."

The demands Benavides refers to are five provisions that Mano Amiga worked to get into the contract during the city's negotiation with the San Marcos Police Officers Association last summer. Called the "Hartman Reforms," they are named after former officer Ryan Hartman, who ran a stop sign while

speeding and using his cellphone in June of 2020, causing an accident that killed Jennifer Miller.

Lockhart police recommended that Hartman be charged with criminally negligent homicide, but the district attorney who oversaw the case instead proposed a speeding ticket. Hartman's superiors on the San Marcos police force conducted no investigation of their own and he returned to duty six months after the crash, while Miller's partner Pam Watts has pushed for accountability for Hartman ever since. He was fired for unrelated misconduct in 2022.

The Hartman Reforms would end rules that allow SMPD only 180 days to investigate allegations of officer misconduct and that give officers 48 hours to review evidence against them before answering investigators' questions, among other things. It would also open the secret files that SMPD keeps on their officers to make misconduct allegations publicly available. None of these reforms made it into the contract that was adopted in the fall, even after members of Mano Amiga sat in on the negotiations. The group said it will attend upcoming negotiations as well, which have until June 7 to produce a - Brant Bingamon new contract.

in government leadership. But Cronk's willingness to fall on his sword over the police contract – the decision that, more than anything else, got him fired – could offer insight into Cronk's behavior over the past week.

Speculation among City Hall insiders, including some CMs, has been that Cronk has used the police contract issue to position himself for a new job – whether that be as leader of a different, perhaps more

conservative city, or in something outside of government. He can tell future employers that he was fired for standing up for law enforcement in the face of a liberal city council that was working against the interests of public safety. It would be much better for Cronk to say that is why he got fired, rather than over a mounting number of infrastructure and service failures that came to a head in February 2023.

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

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
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Lone Star film, TV, and gaming industries look for a massive bump in the state's production rebate program

The Texas Moving Image Industry Incentive Program, the state's initiative to attract film, TV, and game production, has been a political kickball since it was founded in 2005. Those arguments have resulted in volatile funding levels, from a peak of \$95 million a decade ago to less than half that now.

This year, the expectation is that Gov. Greg Abbott's proposed budget will stay at the current \$45 million for the 2024-25 biennium; but the moving image industry film, TV, gaming, commercials, and instructional videos - is asking for more. They're not just asking that lawmakers reverse the 10% across-the-board reduction that all state agencies suffered in the current biennium. They're asking for \$200 million.

In mid-January, the Texas Media Production Alliance held a sit-down meeting of industry players, and they all came out on the same page. TXMPA Communications Director Mindy Raymond said, "We all want

the same thing. We want to bring more jobs to Texas."

It all comes down to a very simple equation: According to Texas Film Commiscalculations, every \$1 in production


rebates means \$5.04 of in-state spending. If the Legislature does pick up on TXMPA's proposal, that could mean roughly three-quarters of a billion dollars extra coming to Texas. TXMPA President Paul Jensen said, "There's a crystal-clear correlation between how much funding we have in TMIIIP and how much media production happens in Texas."

If that seems like a lot, it's because Texas has traditionally not allocated enough. New Mexico budgeted \$130 million in incentives in 2022 alone, a pittance compared to Georgia's \$1.3 billion. Such a raise would also be in line, in percentage terms, with Oklahoma, which increased its tax credit fund from \$8 million to \$30 million in 2021 – and that's per annum. not for two years as in Texas. And that's where Texas' troubles really start. There's just not enough money in the kitty, and even though the current biennium does not finish until September, productions were being told last year that the fund was already empty. Jensen said, "When the program's unfunded, that means the projects can't really look at Texas as an option."

And just a couple of big productions eat it up fast: For example, the CW's Walker alone was repaid \$9.3 million in 2021. "Repaid" is the important word there. Advocates for the program roll their eyes about the word "incentive" because it's actually a tax rebate program, rather than an up-front grant. It also sets a high bar by requiring that a minimum 60% of production takes place in Texas and 70% of cast and crew be Texas residents. Moreover, each application goes

through several levels of accounting scrutiny before a single cent is returned. Austin Film Commission Director Brian Gannon said, "They're not getting paid until everything's in the can."

However, combined with the quality of Texas' crew base, that small amount can be enough to convince producers to shoot here - "here" being the entire state. Texas provides an incredible variety of locations within relatively short drives of the major production hubs. Gannon explained, "What happens in Austin always spills into these communities." He noted Yellowstone creator Taylor Sheridan filming at his 6666 Ranch, in between Ft. Worth and Lubbock: "That's gaining some fans within the Legislature that may not have seen action in their districts. ... It's opening eyes that this is a business, and it betters communities."

That's where TXMPA leadership is making their argument for a big increase. Raymond said, "We've been beating the drum long enough that this is a jobs program, it's not a culture war," and that's being reflected in the lobbyists being hired, like Mike Toomey, former chief of staff to Gov. Rick Perry, who is representing the massive planned Hill Country Studios in San Marcos.


After all, TMIIIP is not an arts program. It's incentivizing big businesses to pick Texas over any other state. If there are no incentives, they will go elsewhere, and there's already a long list of runaway productions. With the TMIIIP coffers empty halfway through the current biennium, AMC absorbed the enormous cost of relocating Fear the Walking Dead from Austin to Savannah, Georgia, for its final season. Last year, Texas Monthly touted a new deal with HBO to turn Texas stories into Texas movies and series, and one of those productions, King Rex starring Henry Winkler, is set to film with New Mexico filling in for Texas. That's just one of an estimated half-dozen major series that were in conversations to shoot in Texas including Walker spinoff Walker: Independence – that followed the incentive money out of state. Jensen said, "Texans are tired of other people telling our stories."

The biggest concern is that, if there isn't a dramatic increase, proposed rule changes could see the TMIIIP coffers empty faster than ever. Last December, the secretary of state's office proposed new language that, if accepted by lawmakers, would extended what's eligible. For example, under the proposals, any animated or digital project could apply for a rebate for any work from the first day of asset creation, such as character modeling. On the other end of the pipeline, they would be able to get a rebate on post-production expenditures like image compositing and bug fixes. Gannon said the potential change could reflect how much of a production's costs come after shooting finishes. "Apollo 10½ shot for about a month, but their post was close to two years. Those are people who are being paid and doing work for that consistent amount of time."

Those changes would more accurately reflect how modern production works than the current language, and Jensen praised the Texas Film Commission for "trying to modernize their rules" and for the fact that the proposals reflect conversations with stakeholders that benefit all, especially with technological advances increasingly blurring the lines between gaming development and film production. However, it could empty that purse even faster. Jensen added, "The bottom line is that we're asking for \$200 million." ■

Review: The Play That Goes Wrong

PHYSICS AND FARCE JOIN FORCES TO SURPRISINGLY HILARIOUS EFFECT IN THIS GEORGETOWN PALACE THEATRE PRODUCTION BY BOB ABELMAN

The Play That Goes Wrong, written by Henry Lewis, Henry Shields, and Jonathan Sayer, is a farce that takes place on the opening night of an overly ambitious 1920s-style murder mystery. The play is being performed by a fictional, accident-prone amateur troupe, the Cornley Drama Society, who experiences technical mishaps, minor miscues, and multiple missed lines during the production that

quickly escalate into all-out mayhem and the potential for loads of laughs at the actors' expense. Clearly, it's a troupe with "What's the worst that could happen?" as its vision statement and "The show must go on!" as its motto.

First gaining notoriety in 2012 as a one-act play that premiered

in London, the show achieved worldwide success as a two-act production for a 2017 Broadway run. The thing is, any kind of success seems to defy the odds, for most of us have long outgrown this flavor of frivolity, with its core of inept actors playing serious characters poorly and its low-hanging fruit that finds those characters mindlessly and repeatedly slipping on proverbial banana peels. I admit to occasionally loving me some Three Stooges and, sure, malfunction can be funny, but the idea of two hours of sustained slapstick and silliness had me going into this production with apprehension.

As the play within the play starts, wealthy Charles Haversham (Benjamin Meaders) lies dead on the couch in the family home. Everyone – his brother Cecil (Hayden Smith), fiancée Florence Colleymoore (Mikah Mazza), her brother Thomas (Ross Milsap), and the butler Perkins (Leslie Hethcox) – is a suspect according to Inspector Carter (Stephen Quinn). As the play unfolds, each suspect is interrogated until the murderer is revealed.

But just before any of that, once the house lights go down, the stage lights mistakenly and briefly

come up to reveal an actor crawling across the stage to the couch, where he is to be the dead Charles Haversham. His exposure is a funny if tired bit of business, but it becomes hilarious upon his deer-inheadlights reaction to being caught. The play continues in this vein, as if the playwrights and the good folks at Georgetown Palace Theatre had studied physics between drama classes and put Newton's

third law of motion – that every action results in an equal and opposite reaction – into play.

Under Ron Watson's direction and traffic control, this production's well-rigged and well-executed malfunctions come courtesy of designers Justin Dam and Ron Watson (scenic), Faith

Castaneda (lighting), Justin Anderson (sound), and Cynthia Overton (costumes), and fight choreographer Tobie Minor has his say when malfunctions of the flying and falling nature turn physical. But the show's highlights come as simple yet spectacular reactions to the mayhem, including Quinn's unwavering dumbfoundedness: Hethcox's growing exasperation turned full-on surrender; and Smith turning their character's awkward cluelessness into hilarious opportunities to break the fourth wall to brazenly claim credit for every laugh. Milsap's increasingly dramatic spit takes are also fun, as are Nick Rilev and Morgan Urbanovsky's antics as the sound/lighting guy and stage manager, respectively, who are given the opportunity to portray the sexy Florence when the original actor is rendered unconscious.

Not everything in the script or onstage works: And, quite frankly, two acts of farce does, at times, seem repetitive and tiresome. But thankfully, Newton's first law of motion – inertia – never makes it onto the stage, and this production is still exhaustingly funny, even if it is occasionally just plain exhausting.

Mrs. Lee's Daffodil Garden between Tyler and Gladewater explodes with yellow flowers once a year for four to six weeks between mid-February and mid-March. This year the garden opened on Feb. 10. Nobody can predict exactly how long the spectacle will last, but everyone who has seen it has come away impressed.

Helen Lee began designing the nature preserve in 1951 on land her husband, T.W. Lee, purchased for the gravel deposits, says her great-nephew **Van Vernon**. In the late 1950s, she ordered a box of daffodil bulbs from Holland, but received a boxcar load.

That story is mostly true, says Vernon, who is president of the Helen Lee Foundation that maintains the property and opens it to the public for free.

Mrs. Lee envisioned planting the bulbs among the pine trees, but she kept adding more hillsides she wanted covered with her favorite flower. By the time the nurseryman totaled the area, it came to nearly 70 acres, requiring a railroad car load.

The garden was a labor of love for Mrs. Lee. She built a log cabin like the one she grew up in overlooking a pond she named Lake Josephine after her mother. Her descendants named a larger pond after her.

"She had a boat she paddled out into the lake and fed cat food to the biggest catfish you ever saw," Vernon says. "They were like pets."

Helen Lee died in 1984, outliving her husband by 30 years. Her will stipulates the perpetual care of the garden for the



enjoyment of the community.

Sebastián Driussi Signs Three-Year Austin FC Contract Extension

If there were any lingering worries over whether **Austin FC** would be able to do good business in the post-**Claudio Reyna** era, the club put those concerns soundly to bed Tuesday by announcing a multiyear contract extension with star midfielder **Sebastián Driussi** through the 2025 season, with an option for 2026.

It's difficult to overstate Driussi's importance to the Verde and Black, coming off a sublime 2022 season in which the 27-year-old Argentine scored a league-leading 25 goals – including three tallies in the **MLS Cup Playoffs** – and also chipped in seven assists. But as Austin supporters well know, having watched Driussi week in and week out since his summer 2021 arrival from Russia, his impact is felt even beyond the stat sheet.

Driussi's devastating combination of spectacular on-ball quality and savvy off-ball movement has earned him practically universal recognition as one of the very best players in MLS. As part of his new deal with ATXFC, per footy newsman Fabrizio Romano, he'll now be amongst the league's highest-paid players as well.

"I love everything about this club and everything about this city. It's a new club and a special project. My family is happy here, I'm happy here, and I'd [sign the extension] 10 more times if I had to," said Driussi at a Tuesday afternoon press conference, also revealing that he had an "important" offer from a club in England during the offseason that he turned down to remain in Austin.

A well-earned pay bump, especially one that won't have any salary cap ramifications for the rest of the roster (Driussi was already a Designated Player, whose wages are largely off the books), is a small price to pay for El Tree to lock up the franchise centerpiece through the remainder of his prime. And should Driussi's talent continue to attract the attention of more potential suitors across the Atlantic, Tuesday's contract extension would no doubt up any theoretical transfer fee into the range Austin FC could more easily live with.

But that's all conjecture at this point. The here and now concerns Driussi's role in ATXFC's pursuit of up to five competitive trophies in the upcoming campaign, including the **CONCACAF Champions League**. He's already made the switch to jersey No. 10, famously worn by the late Pelé and

symbolically reserved for a club's creative maestro. Perhaps the move is a harbinger for a renewed focus on being a goal provider in addition to a goalscorer in 2023.

If so, one man that stands to benefit is offseason free agent signing **Gyasi Zardes**, expected to serve as the club's starting striker more times than not this year. A former MLS All-Star with over 100 league and playoff goals to his name, Zardes admired Austin FC from afar last season and admitted to daydreaming about bagging goals atop the Verde's high-octane attack. Of course, much of that had to do with Driussi. The early up-close impressions throughout preseason haven't disappointed.

"Seba's a special player," Zardes said after a recent training session. "I've been raving about him to a bunch of my buddies around the league, like, 'This guy is legit.' He looks for his striker every time he gets the ball ... when I don't think he can find me, he finds me every single time."

Driussi's extension also marks the biggest piece of business for the ATX front office since **Josh Wolff** and **Sean Rubio** jointly took over interim sporting director duties in the wake of Reyna's departure. So far, Wolff has maintained an upbeat attitude regarding the increased responsibility. "It's a very fluid space ... so I enjoy being a part of that. I was part of the roster-building to some degree with Claudio when we started this journey," Wolff said. "It's a difficult task to coach a team and have them prepared every week, so I think that's my priority."

2023 Oscar-Nominated Shorts: The Best of the Brief

Before the Academy votes, we pick our faves from the nominees BY THE SCREENS TEAM

Three categories – animated, documentary, live action – with five nominees in each, highlighting the wild and wild diversity of filmmaking under 40 minutes (the official Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Science's definition of a short film). With the Oscars scheduled for March 12, now is your chance to catch all 15 of the nominated short films as they play in Austin cinemas. Here're our picks for the most moving, innovative, and entertaining in each category.

Animated - "My Year of Dicks"

Now, no giggling when the title of the South by Southwest 2022 Special Jury Prize-winning "My Year of Dicks" is announced as a nominee. Adapted from former Austinite and Ralph Breaks the Internet scriptwriter Pamela Ribon's 2017 memoir, Notes to Boys: And Other Things I Shouldn't Share in Public, its confessional tone, finessed in her online diary, Squishy, "My Year in Dicks" isn't shy about its intent. Fifteenyear-old Pam is hellbent on not being a virgin at 16, and her stumbles and awkward fumbling through five prospective deflowerings are caught in five chapters, each given a distinctive style, from Linklater-esque verité to early Nineties MTV looseness through hyper-kawaii and even some Junji Ito for that hormonal nightmare, all told with comedic confessional vim. - Richard Whittaker

Documentary – "The Elephant Whisperers"

In the Theppakadu Elephant Camp in Southern India, Kartiki Gonsalves and Guneet Monga's "The Elephant Whisperers" follows a couple, Belli and Bomman, who work to raise orphaned baby elephants, an endeavor that has an almost nonexistent success rate. Except for Belli and Bomman, who have raised two of them, Raghu and Ammu. Prepare to fall hard for these li'l pachyderms, with lessons in healing, family, and spirituality. This is the heart-warmer of the set. - Josh Kupecki

Live Action - "Le Pupille"

This year there are no dreamy stars like Riz Ahmed and Oscar Isaac to gravitate toward, but "Le Pupille" is glossy enough, directed by Happy as Lazzaro's Alice Rohrwacher and starring her older sister Alba Rohrwacher (The Lost Daughter, I Am Love). At 38 minutes it just barely qualifies to be a short film (40 minutes is the max), but it's by far the easiest of the five to digest, with its cheeky childhood antics and even cheekier nuns. It's a slice-of-life Christmas farce, as sweet as the cake Serafina (Melissa Falasconi) dares to eat and unassuming enough for Disney+ to get behind it.

ANT-MAN AND THE WASP: **OUANTUMANIA**

D: Peyton Reed: with Paul Rudd. Evangeline Lilly. Jonathan Majors, Michael Douglas, Michelle Pfeiffer, Kathryn Newton, Bill Murray, David Dastmalchian. (PG-13, 125 min.)

It's a worry that has plagued the Marvel Cinematic Universe since Iron Man: When would the franchise jump the rails? Well, arguably that happened with Phase 4, the post-Infinity Saga stories meant to wrap up the first big arc of the series and launch a new era of heroes. The TV side of things on Disney+, such as Loki and WandaVision, ended up being some of the best-received entries in the massive enterprise, while films like Eternals landed with a damp thud.

So now the question is, can the littlest superhero get the film side of things back on track? The answer, as provided by Ant-Man and the Wasp: Quantumania, is a giant-sized yes, as Paul Rudd and Evangeline Lilly return to not only seemingly wrap up the story of Scott Lang, the petty thief turned Avenger, but also hurl headfirst into Phase 5 and the upcoming multiversal menace of Kang the Conqueror.

Quantumania, the third movie about Rudd's jovial if panicked hero, is really a family affair: He and techno-philanthropist Hope van Dyne (Lilly), his daughter, Cassie (Newton), and van Dyne's reunited parents, Hank Pym (the delightfully eccentric Douglas) and Janet van Dyne (a suitably enigmatic Pfeiffer), are all reunited in

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

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The Keys to Spike Lee: Ashley Clark on Bamboozled

AFS screening and signing unpacks Spike Lee's ugliest and most misunderstood movie by KATIE KARP

When thinking of Spike Lee and his capturing of the African American experience, films like Inside Man. BlackkKlansman, and Malcolm X may come to mind. Since his 1986 breakthrough She's Gotta Have It, the African American director has continually created movies with box-office success and high esteem for their racial commentary. Bamboozled, however, was an exception: On its initial release in 2000, many viewers were offended and many critics - white critics in particular - dismissed the film as heavy-handed.

Twenty-two years after its premiere, film historian Ashley Clark, author of Facing Blackness: Media and Minstrelsy in Spike Lee's Bamboozled, will explore its depth and overlooked importance in a screening and book signing at AFS Cinema on Feb. 19.

Bamboozled chronicles a Black TV producer with a mission to create a show offensive enough to make him lose his job, but the resulting modern-day minstrel show is a success. In themes and aesthetics alike, the film is ugly. "I'd be disingenuous if I said I thought it was a surprise that the film was quite poorly received," said Clark. "It's a very hostile film. Lee proved to be unafraid of engaging with difficult issues like interracial relationships, gentrification and violence, but his films were always quite digestible. Bamboozled was not."

Clark first saw Bamboozled in 2001 as a teenager in his hometown of London. England, and he was disturbed and unsure of what to make of it. The more Clark experienced the realities of racism in the media

and society, the film kept coming back to him for depicting the ugly subject, raw and ruthlessly. "With Bamboozled, you've got the keys to everything Spike Lee: aesthetically, politically, stylistically. I think it's all kind of there in a very confrontational and quite unguarded way. The ugly truth of it is all there."

From minstrelsy to exploitive stereotypes, Bamboozled delves into the history and lineage of what Black representation has been onscreen and how it's taken root in the imagination, showing what American entertainment has done to the Black image. "When you look at someone like Kanye West wearing a 'White Lives Matter' jacket and talking about how he wouldn't have been enslaved himself, it is clear that there really are characters today that seem larger than life, completely outrageous and bamboozled," said Clark. "In terms of media commentary in the new age of Donald Trump, the film started to look less crazy, which is really unsettling given what happens in the film."

Clark originally wrote his book as an opportunity to express his feelings on the heavy film. First published by the Critical Press in 2015 to celebrate the film's 15th anniversary, Facing Blackness was re-released last October by Film Desk Books with a new foreword. "It's an invitation to people that it's really rewarding to wrestle with difficult films to unpack," said Clark. "Bamboozled is a good one to do that with because it's easier to just dismiss, as I did when I was 15."

San Francisco, even if there are rumblings of dysfunction underneath it all. Superficially, it's with the daddy-daughter issues between Scott and Cassie, who is constantly irked that her hero dad seems to have fallen out of the hero business, but it's really about what happened to Janet in those 30 years in which she was trapped in the subatomic Quantum Realm, and exactly what - or rather, who - she was there with: Kang (Majors, simmering with animosity and ambition), whose machinations bring the whole family into his infinitesimal empire.

Quantumania is, quite frankly, everything that Taika Waititi's dismal run on Thor (the continuity-dismissive Ragnarok and the infuriating Love and Thunder) was not. Director Peyton Reed returns a genuine sense of cosmic wonder that has been lacking from recent Marvel movies, crafting a bizarre and physics-defying Quantum Realm that gorgeously melds the mechanical and the biological in fun, gooey ways ("Drink the slime!"). He introduces a panoply of exotic new species, residents of this subatomic realm that pulsate and fluoresce, scarcely recognizable as life forms but so very alive. Indeed, this version of the Quantum Realm may be the most enthralling and immersive addition to sci-fi habitats since George Lucas first took us to the city-planet of Coruscant, a place that feels like it exists beyond the confines of the frame.

But, most importantly, Quantumania holds two raw emotions: love and terror. Love in the form of the dysfunctional extended Ant-family, an idiosyncratic bunch who you genuinely feel would lay everything on the line for each other. And terror in the brutal, manipulative, murderous intent of Majors as Kang. When the time-traveling dictator was first announced as the new big bad of the MCU, there was a ripple of concern. After all, his backstory in the comics is such a convoluted mishmash of incarnations, variants, and alter egos that it's often unclear if the writers know who he is. But there's a clear focus here,

established by scriptwriter Jeff Loveness and building upon Michael Waldron's development of the character in the Loki series for Disney+. That's where we first saw Majors, but not as Kang. There he was He Who Remains, a variant of Kang manipulating the multiverse in his role as the lesser evil. But this Kang is the greater evil, Kang the Conqueror, a perfect fusion of sadism and megalomania, tempered with a taste for manipulation and cruelty. Evil rolls off Majors' performance in waves, making him an apt successor to and utterly distinct from the equally genocidal Thanos: After all, the Mad Titan saw himself as a benevolent force for good, but this Kang has bloody, bloody hands and likes that ferric smell.

And that's exactly why it's such a genius move to place him in pitched battle against the MCU's biggest putz. Rudd's take on Scott Lang has always been rooted in his firm belief that, at some point, he's going to get found out. It's Rudd's easy. slightly panicked charm that makes Quantumania work, just as much as Majors' malice, even if they're clearly imbalanced in powers. The MCU has never been shy about killing off major characters, and as it really embraces the post-Iron Man, post-Captain America, post-Thor era, there's a real feeling that Kang's menacing ways could make it the post-Ant-Man era. Quantumania goes big, but it never forgets that Ant-Man is our guy.

MAGIC MIKE'S LAST DANCE

D: Steven Soderbergh; with Channing Tatum, Salma Hayek Pinault, Nancy Carroll, Ayub Khan Din, Jemelia George, Caitlin Gerard. (R, 112 min.)

Look, I'm not a fan of male stripping. It's all very silly to me. If that's the way you make your green, more power to you. I'm just not into it. Having said that, I have enjoyed watching both previous Magic Mike films for reasons, and am





interested in Magic Mike's Last Dance, the supposed capper to the Magic Mike trilogy.

It's been a rough few years for Mike Lane (Tatum). Having lost his furniture business due to the COVID-19 pandemic, he's tending bar at a lavish party in Miami for Maxandra Mendoza (Hayek Pinault), the soon-to-be ex-wife of a media mogul. She's bored and lonely, so when a friend tells Max she needs to get some of that goodness Mike has to offer, she hits him up as the party winds down. He declines ... at first.

And then, woo wee, all bets are off.

That scene (I'm convinced just calling it "that scene" is enough) between Max and Mike, holy shit, is one of the hottest things I've seen in movies in a long time (and that includes the previous Magic Mike movies containing some hotass shit). Seriously, Tatum and Hayek Pinault generate some true fire. Tatum was a dancer back in the day and he's still got the moves, and he's charming as hell, but still gets short shrift as an actor, and is more than able to hold his own. But while this is called Magic Mike's Last Dance, it's Havek Pinault's movie as much as it is Tatum's. While Mike is just trying to make some fast cash to pay off the other lad's investments in his furniture business, Max is working through her own shit: estranged from her controlling husband, with a teen daughter, Zadie (George), who feels abandoned by both parents. Max throws herself into this venture with Mike without thinking it through. She's trying to figure it out as she goes, to the detriment of everyone around her.

Having sat out the first sequel, returning Magic Mike director Steven Soderbergh has made an entertaining enough movie, but it's the weakest of the series. It's like hardly any thought went into whether the story actually worked, as if scriptwriter Reid Carolin wrote prompts like "hot as fuck," "London," "West End," and "Pony" on some cards and then tied them all together with the tiniest string.

But guess what? None of that matters because Tatum can dance his ass off and he does not disappoint here. Yes, the story is silly, but the film is entertaining. It's still not enough to make me want to hit up a male strip club or anything, but I would absolutely not say no if Tatum came to my house and wanted to dance for me. Just sayin'.

partner in the senior-year finals, has called on the morning of their scheduled exam performance from a payphone near the beach where she just woke up after a night of hard partying, her exact location a mystery.

Lacking the transportation to fetch his hotmess classmate, Kol ends up relying on Ebony's slightly older brother Adam (Green) for help. In town for 24 hours before leaving for doctoral school, the super cool Adam is as polished as Kol is unpolished, with a sexy smile and an assured manner that's never predatory, but damn alluring. The two hit it off during their long, intimate ride in Adam's not-so-sexy station wagon, their conversation at times flirty and teasing. But when the older man mentions his ex, Kol automatically assumes a former girlfriend, until Adam finally (but gently) corrects him. (For the initiated, the clues are there.) The tone shifts immediately as Kol reacts to this unexpected revelation with a mixture of panic and thrill. This first half of the film predictably ends in the way-back section of the Holden Kingswood before the exchange of teary goodbyes come morning. On its own, it's a nicely drawn vignette, tapping a palpable sense of desire between the two leads.

Fast-forward 10 years to the Melbourne airport where the two men bump into each other, both in town to attend the dependably narcissistic Ebony's wedding. (Her annoyingly one-dimensional character seems to exist solely as a device to bring the principals together.) Adam hasn't changed much, but (wow!) Kol's transformation over the interceding decade is remarkable. The diamond-in-the-rough of the film's first half now gleams, the facial acne gone and an air of confidence complementing his GQ appearance, at least on the surface of things.

What becomes more puzzling in director/ screenwriter Stolevski's increasingly less articulate script is Adam's motivation in all of this, particularly given his relatively greater experience with the pain and glory of personal relationships. It's understandable what the brief encounter years ago might have meant to Kol, but the movie's presentation of Adam's sadness as on par with the younger man's longing and regret simply doesn't sell. Not to belittle Adam's genuine sensitivity (or Green's subtly charismatic performance), but Of an Age is Kol's story rather than a love story, with Adam playing an important albeit supporting role in it. That said, missed opportunity and bad timing inform the romantic interlude in Of an Age in a way many of us have experienced at least once. To paraphrase a metaphor fashioned by American poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, we are but ships that pass in the night, exchanging a look or a voice, followed by darkness and silence. Geez, that sure sounds depressing.

Food

It's a family affair as two sisters from Austin's Eastside emerge with twin trailers honoring their mother's legacy

When you pass 5903 Wellington Dr., at first you might not notice the pink food trailer in a small grassy field across from the apartments. Sometimes you can feel the trunk-rattling rumble from old-school slabs banging Screw as they swing their way through the Eastside (although that particular phenomenon becomes rarer and rarer as years go by and prices go up). It is here in the heart of Windsor Park that bornand-raised Austinite sisters Tieisha Hyder and Timisha Jones first established their food truck businesses.

Twins who were born the youngest of four sisters, Hyder and Jones (who is technically the older of the two) grew up on Luna Street across the way from Givens Park before moving to Pecan Springs, and attended Sims Elementary as children, followed by Lamar Middle School and Anderson High. It's clear their late mother, Evelyn Faye Hutchins Williams, ranks as an obvious influence on the women, who both named their trucks in honor of her. Evelyn's favorite color was pink, which inspired Hyder's signature pink trailer and benches, and there are pictures of Evelvn on the truck.

The sisters say that the food game is in their blood. Their mother would often host and organize card games, cooking while the girls waited on the clientele for tip money. It instilled the hustle of the hospitality industry into Evelyn's children, and they learned how to cook for large groups by watching her prep in the kitchen. Hyder also gives a shout-out to Austin-area legend "Nubian Queen" Lola Stephens-Bell as her cousin and says their grandmother once had a restaurant on East 12th Street.

Hyder operates her food truck, MaMa'Z Soul Kitchen, on Wellington Drive and cheerfully greets every person who walks up to her trailer. "I love the community. I love the supporters. They motivate me to do everything that I get up and try to do," she says. Just a block away to the northwest is old Windsor Village, the neighborhood's central commercial space now owned by Transwestern; the shopping center is now razed and under construction while the Windsor Park Neighborhood Association

still attempts to combat the developer's plans for the area.

Hyder originally began cooking professionally as a way to make money while dealing with her own issues: Namely, that she was shot in the head and back when she was 20 years old. She says, "I was actually up the street from Givens ... I was young, but I didn't have any business being that way ... [They shot up the] party and I was an innocent bystander."

She continues, "During those days, I was doing wrong. I was hustling and trying to make ends meet from easy money. I'm not gonna deny anything I did, but 'wrong place, wrong time' got me shot up. I went to prison [and] did kitchen and hoe squad ... That was a lesson to me because hoe squad would have you singing in line and chopping grass with an aggie [hoe]. That motivated me along with being away from my kids and my mom. Every time I would go down, my mom would get sick or someone would pass. They wouldn't let you go to funerals so ... It all was a lesson to just do better for myself because if you're working down there for them, [it's] for free. You're not getting paid anything but three [hots and a] cot a day."

During the process of recovering and figuring out what to do with herself, Hyder decided to start selling food. "I started from nothing, from fixing plates out of my car," she says. "I sold plates out of my red car and made enough to be able to purchase the trailer. I would deliver to local companies or jobs and then my clientele was built." As she currently lives near LBJ High School, she wanted to have the business near where she stays. "I had a friend named Patrick that sold turkey legs here [in town] and he knew somebody that had a spot [on Wellington] ... I've been here ever since and I love them ... they became family."

Hyder has been running MaMa'Z Soul Kitchen for more than three years, with a rotating menu that changes week by week. Her common specials include the fan favorite oxtails (cooked with mushrooms and peppers)

and enchiladas (brisket or beef) along with smothered turkey, pork chops, and chicken, but also pasta, tacos, seafood boils, big chef salad plates, and gumbo. She uses Facebook to post her ever-changing weekly menus and status updates on how close she is to selling out for the day. Although her plates typically start at \$17, her portions are huge and easily make two or three full servings for a single adult with a healthy appetite.

"It ain't nann meal that I haven't done that's not gourmet! You know it's all good if you selling out everyday," she says. "Some people [who own restaurants] have to have leftovers [at the end of the day] and I just thank the Lord I don't."

Jones' truck, Big Mama's Kitchen, operates at 12th and Springdale alongside Hungry Hill Handwash and Detail, which helps long-term unhoused residents of East Austin find employment. Across the street from Jones' truck is Sims Elementary (which now sits empty as Austin ISD merged the student body with nearby Norman Elementary because of declining enrollment), Country Boyz Fixins (a local soul food staple that closed due to the economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic), and thriving coffee shop Palomino Coffee.

Jones worked in health care for 14 years prior to getting into the food entrepreneurship industry herself, along with her partner, Otis Campbell, "When my sister opened her food truck, I said I could do it too. Starting it and getting it up and running was the hardest part," she says. "We tried to figure out what people would like best for soul food. It was always my passion. I just always wanted to travel out of town and be a cook on a cruise."

Jones' truck has a consistent menu that focuses on traditional soul food cuisine. She knocks soul food out of the park with her well-seasoned takes on classic comfort foods like pork chops or chicken-fried chicken. Her personal favorites are the Dirty Damn Cajun Chicken Tenders and the boudin balls, while Campbell cites the pork chops as his go-to meal.

Open for a little more than a year, Big Mama's Kitchen moved to 12th and Springdale a few months ago. Campbell says, "We're still trying to figure out the best locations and see how the business is." Jones' goal is ultimately to open up a brickand-mortar restaurant.

Her younger sister's expansion plans, on the other hand, involve eventually getting a second truck located in a different part of town to better serve her customer base in the Austin area. Hyder relishes the freedom that comes with not being tied down by a permanent location or menu. "I don't wanna put too much on myself that I can't bear. I try to work with what help I have and make sure I have a certain amount [of food] every day," she says. "Once it's gone and I sell out, I'm going home and going to bed. I don't do too much I know I can't handle." She cautions entrepreneurs not to overextend or overcommit themselves, adding, "If you try to do 'this, this, and this,' you're not going to make it. People [are] not gonna come to you every day. This is a lot of work."

As these twin Texan sisters who have spent the majority of their lives on Austin's Eastside continue to grow into their new callings as entrepreneurs in the city's food scene, they do so in a space where

everything from food prices to the ability to find good help to standard real estate lease amounts can shift on a seemingly monthto-month basis. "We embrace the change," Jones and Campbell both say.

Hyder has a similar perspective. "The change I see is that everybody's moving from outta town up here. But they love the food, so hey! They wanna buy a property, let them buy it. You know, I meet a lot of good people. Some of them are from California, Louisiana ... just different places!" She pauses for a moment. "The community has changed a lot. But it's okay ... what can we do about it? Just go with the flow."

Austin's Gold Rush Vinyl Doubles Record Manufacturing Capacity

Pressing plant expands machinery to meet steady demand by CHAD SWIATECKI

The ongoing boom in the popularity of vinyl records has been good for business at Austin's Gold Rush Vinyl pressing plant so good that the North Austin company has added two new pressing machines.

The new machines - a pair of Pheenix Alpha AD12 presses manufactured in Sweden - will allow Gold Rush to double its production and keep up with demand. They're expected to be up and running this week. Once fully operational, company founder Caren Kelleher said Gold Rush will be able to turn out "tens of thousands" of pieces of vinyl every week for bands and labels in Austin and far beyond.

The new capacity will cut the company's turnaround time down to three to four months, some of the fastest delivery in an industry still struggling to keep up with the resurgence in vinyl sales that began more than a decade ago. Kelleher said she no longer worries about the vinyl boom turning out to be a fad, with typical order sizes taken by the company growing from 500 to 1,000 or more pieces in recent years. Business stayed strong even through the pandemic, when touring collapsed and recording artists had to rely on physical product sales to generate income.

"In 2020 and 2021, sales numbers across the industry were through the roof. The number of quote requests and order requests we [had] coming in indicated that the business was going to keep growing," she said, noting that the wait time for pressing machines from manufacturers in Canada, Germany, and the Czech Republic has grown alongside record orders.

"With the explosive growth of vinyl, a lot of the big pressing plants grabbed up all available equipment, so what used to be a threemonth lead time for new machines became about 18 months. We had hoped to have these machines installed much sooner. We decided to get them in February 2020, and our second machine finally arrived in November 2022."

Expansion to four lines in the company's 8.400-square-foot facility will require a staffing increase. Kelleher expects to hire up to six more full-time workers to handle pressing, packaging, and many other tasks involved in the very specialized, and at times challenging, manufacturing process.

During a recent visit, staff shared stories about how the two Canadian-made WarmTone machines, which have been running for five years, have developed animallike idiosyncrasies that require regular attention and problem-solving. For example, the same vinyl pellets melt and press differently based solely on what color bag - brown or white they were packaged in.

Beyond the new presses, Gold Rush has set up a creative studio area that uses its trimmings and waste vinyl material to make decorative products like notebooks, earrings, clocks, and vinyl flower bouquets available for Valentine's Day.

Also, a local investor gifted Gold Rush an Eighties-era particle deposition and vaporization machine that looks like it came straight out of The Adventures of Flash Gordon. The vintage technology allows the company to cre-

ate commemorative gold- and platinum-plated records. Operating as a separate business unit under Gold Rush Vinyl, the company can serve fans who want a decorative ode to a favorite album, or artists looking to make keepsake mountings of successful records.

After spending more than a year to get the deposition machine up and running, reception for the gold record business has been strong. Oklahoma composer Kitt Wakeley, who met Kelleher through membership in the Recording Academy, turned to the company to honor the musicians and producers who contributed to his recent Grammy-winning album An Adoption Story.

"It's a great keepsake," he said. "Not everyone involved with the project will receive a Grammy trophy, but they deserved it. This was something I knew would be eye-catching and they'd want to hang on their wall."

Wakeley, who also uses Gold Rush to press his next April album, notes that the company's turnaround time is far better than the 18-to-24 months he was quoted from other pressing plants around the country.

The appeal is similar for Austin's Spaceflight Records, which has pressed a half-dozen albums through Gold Rush and has five releases scheduled for 2023. Founder Brett Orrison said Gold Rush has consistently delivered high-quality, on-time runs, with the local availability providing a clear advantage over other pressing plants in Detroit, Nashville, and Athens, Georgia. The doubling of capacity, he said, sends a clear signal that Austin has a reliable industry resource committed to independent artists and labels.

"It's important to champion the industry in this town, and having a vinyl record plant is amazing so we're trying to use Gold Rush as much as possible," he said. "They've always reached [our] expectations to get things done on time and give us clean, nice-sounding records."

The indie label joins a growing mix of customers turning to the company with niche orders - from video game soundtracks and podcast recordings to commemorative products for the Moody Center, Fairmont Austin hotel, and major corporations such as Dropbox.

"That's a different kind of business that provides us some other opportunities," adds Kelleher. "So that's been a nice and strange change, in terms of how much of our business is shifting to other businesses commissioning vinyl."

PARISH, the Resound and Heard Presents-owned live music venue, reopened Tuesday after an electrical fire temporarily paused all business for the space back in October. Connected listening lounge My Oh My, located behind the venue in the former North Door locale, also resumed operations, complete with a reimagined drink menu and new business hours Wednesday through Sunday. This week marks the "re-re-reopening" of both connected businesses. A slew of musical performances include Portland indie-pop duo Quasi (Feb. 17), a Stevie Wonder installment of Rock & Roll Playhouse (Feb. 19), and L.A. synth-pop singer Chappell Roan (Feb. 20). Besides stellar lineups, the space rounds out their February calendar with various social media giveaways, a surprise Hit List Comedy lineup (Feb. 24), and sets from DJ Python and Anthony Naples (Feb. 25). Expect announcements for South by Southwest, when the celebratory grand opening for 501 Brushy will take place.

BILLY STRINGS, the biggest star of modern bluegrass (who else in the genre could headline two nights at the Moody Center this coming June?), made a surprise appearance at Radio Coffee & Beer's Bluegrass Monday residency last week. The lightning-hands acoustic guitarist joined top-shelf local pickers Andrew Pressman, Tony Kamel, Luke Bulla, and Kym Warner for the entire second set, including leading "Cocaine Blues" and "John Henry." Onstage, Strings effusively praised the fellow musicians and gave special props to mandolinist Warner seemingly the only member he didn't know already. Kamel said Strings' appearance was unexpected but no surprise, because "that guy just straight-up lives to pick. Always has. Always will." Strings wore a "Listen to Blaze Foley" shirt and, on the advice of Austin Music Awards director Paul Minor, visited Foley's grave at the nearby Live Oak Cemetery the following morning.



The **Divine Feminine**

East-and-West-fusing oracle Nagavalli reaches bevond

Hair! Spiked, highlighted, the fresh crown reaches toward the sky - growing up, up, up, while also spreading out and around. Nagavalli's trademark shaved head disappears under a warm cover-up on this cool, grav MLK Dav.

"This is new," she laughs in the doorway to her far-North Austin home. "This is verv new!"

Later, nearly three hours deep into an English tea-like tell-all, she redresses the subject upon inquiry of her iconic look.

"It's been easily five or six years since I began shaving it," she estimates. "I shed a few tears the first time I did it. I wore a wig, because I had to go into some work meetings in California. This is the kind of choice I would make: to shave my head on the day before I'm flying off to California. I wore an expensive wig for four days, then came back home.

"That Friday, I was supposed to go back to work here, and I was like, 'This is crazy,' and I just took it off. I've been walking around like that ever since. I didn't know why, but it happened. It was just visceral."

So too its musical oracle, whose hair hardly constitutes the only crop she's cultivated this winter. Numinosum, the Indian singer's third full-length, culminates an Austin music scene evolution hovering just past twin decades. Potent and immediate, the album vibrates, emanates, elucidates a world fusion for jet-setters and Travis Heights denizens alike. Indian twang for hippies and East Cesar Chavez dwellers, diva soul for soccer moms in ATX satellite burbs, its public radio clarity proves visceral indeed: spacious yet wired, distant but universal, unsubtitled and liberated.

Numinosum is Nagavalli's moment here, there, everywhere. And amongst her collaborators especially.

"[The] music is based on her background in Indian folk, classical, bhajans, and regional music," explains LP guest and master sitarist Indrajit Banerjee. "Pay close attention to the very original



compositions and beautiful lyrics. [Her] songs in English are influenced by East Indian spirituality and [she] creates a unique mixture of sounds with her sonorous voice. She blends Western and Indian instruments very nicely."

"The way she weaves Eastern scales into her vocals is stunning," agrees Austin folk pioneer-turned-New Mexico transplant Eliza Gilkyson, whose song "Midnight Oil" closes Numinosum. "So much more complex than Western music scales, and she masters it effortlessly."

"We would bring Nagavalli onstage at Vallejo shows and packed crowds would stand there with their jaws open as she wailed majestic sounds over Latin-Zeppelinesque soundscapes," chimes in key producer, studio space provider, and guitarist AJ Vallejo.

"Valli is adventurous but can also be settled in singing a beautiful traditional song from India," says the local musicmaker singularly responsible for the Mumbai-reared crier's entry into the homegrown scene, Oliver Rajamani. "Not all singers from the Indian tradition are open to trying new things like her. So these two qualities of adventure and tradition have created over the years a sound of her own with her own band that's great to see."

PROFOUND TRANSFORMATION

Born Nagavalli Medicharla in the southeastern coastal state of Andhra Pradesh, the younger of two children to parents from the area looked to follow into the family business: physics. Father professed at St. Xavier's College in Mumbai, the seventh-largest city on the planet, where the teeming crush outside remained at bay. Despite teen crises. she received undergraduate and graduate degrees in said field before heading to Tallahassee, Florida, for the Ph.D.

After the culture shock wore off and she and her roommate began mitigating their bounteous Walmart raids, she considered her brother's dedication to labs and executed an about-face.

Jumping to the business school there, she found the quickest route to a master's degree and finished a management information systems program in a year. Six months behind her roomie who'd been lured by Dell, she moved to Austin at the millennium, knowing only its repute as a "music town." A good coder who excelled in software testing, she recalls promising offers from California, but by then taking a steady corporate tech job here - her focus had already narrowed almost imperceptibly.

"My mom sang a bit," she elaborates. "Her sister sang really well. My mom's 78 and I bet she could still cry over this, because my grandmom didn't think her voice was good enough for her to learn classical music. But she put the younger sister into a classical music class, so my mom used to sit in the next room and listen to her sister sing, and learn.

"In some ways, if I have to believe in such things, I feel the fact that I sing is literally my mom manifesting that. I have not seen many people who say, 'We believe in some form of rebirth in the culture.' but my mom says, 'If I'm born again, I want just one thing: I want to have a good singing voice.' That's her dream - that she can sing really well.

"So a lot of the credit for this goes to my mom's side, but my dad, he had an amaaazing teaching voice. He had a very strong voice. I feel like I get some of my singing abilities from my father's side as well, even though they weren't professional singers. The tonal quality of their voices was something."

Nagavalli emulated that familial trait as well. In first or second grade, a dance teacher heard her singing and suggested she be enrolled in music. From that point into college, she studied and played Indian classical: ragas (improvisational motifs), bhajans (devotionals), chants. Year one in the Lone Star seat, she and her Florida foil ran into Rajamani at one of Austin's (then) three or four Indian eateries.

"I was shy," recalls Nagavalli, "but when my friend left, I snuck back into the restaurant and told him, 'Hey, I really want to sing. Would you consider having me sing with you?' And Ollie - Ollie - he's like, 'Yeah, yeah, yeah. Come over!' He gave me his number, 'Come see me sometime."

One bhajan later. Austin's longtime Indian/Romani/Texan fusionist invited her to sit in at a Ruta Maya gig. Local jazz mage Suzi Stern forged the next link of fate, chance, destiny by introducing Nagavalli to her virtuoso community, who the latter turned around

and hired for a grand coming out at the Cactus Cafe, home to myriad guest appearances with Rajamani. Paying musicians out of pocket didn't add up even back then for Nagavalli, now a longtime Visa project manager. So only several cycles into the brand-new century. she back-channeled music - for more years than polite.

When she returned in 2009, she stayed: a three-song EP in 2010, debut longplayer Eastern Soul two years later, and 2019 spiritual suite Immersion. Whip-In, Momo's, and Kenny Dorham's Backyard followed, as did studio collaborations with producer musicians including AJ Vallejo and current sonic partner Katie Marie. Their Numinosum refers to the mysterious, the fascinating.

"I believe the term came from Rudolph Otto, who was a theologian, and was looking for what unites all spirituality regardless of religion," nods Nagavalli, "Inherent to that term, or word, is a lot of curiosity as to what might manifest from the conscious and subconscious mind, or being, that's beyond our linear perception. What holds the most for me about numinosum is this idea that you're pondering, you're [reflecting]. You're having a lull.

"Then you explore and there's this moment when creativity happens and that is numinosum. It is a moment where, perhaps, one is capable of profound transformation."

O SHE SAYS

"I've played lots of shows with Nagavalli as her bass player, drummer or acoustic guitarist," emails co-producer Marie. "About three years ago, I started working out of Blue Rock Studios in Wimberley. I thought it would be the perfect location for Valli's album. We had multiple meetings to plan the material we'd be using, but it was a very organic process, so we gave it the space it needed to go in whichever direction it needed.

"I learnt so much from Valli about traditional Indian music and it was incredibly fun mixing Western and Eastern influences. I wanted the album to reflect Valli's incredible talent and be a beautiful reflection of the amazing musician and human she is."

Numinosum raises goosebumps from Nagavalli's first quaver on opener "Algiri Nandini," set against percussive hand iingles and Banerjee's scorpion sitar, the chant bulging and flaring powerfully à la Dead Can Dance or even Robert Plant's Sensational Space Shifters: stinging, sternum-tingling

> drone and Indian mysticism. "Ocean Blue" plunges just as quickly into torchpop, a Kate Bush blush with millennial lift. Backup "I See You" takes one step back from that, fairly begging for the progressivecontemporary FM airwayes of Nineties Austin radio.

> "O She throws in with the

latter two, immediately calling for the return of all-women festivals like Lilith Fair.

"'Aigiri Nandani' is a very popular chant in India, a stotram," says its singer. "It's a chant for the divine feminine. Many understand it as a chant for [goddess] Devi Durga, the fiercest form of the divine feminine. Moving along the [piece], there are chants on Lakshmi, Parvati, Saraswati, the different forms of the divine feminine. It's attributed to ancient guru Adi Shankaracharya, who wrote this, and it's very popular in India. I heard it a lot growing up.

"I have always liked to start my albums with an invocation. There are two more spiritual compositions on the album. One is 'Damadam Mast Qalander,' which is Sufi, and then 'Guru,' which is a bhajan written by Sant Eknath. Also, as a matter of respect and this idea of starting something with an invocation of the divine, I will always begin an album with a chant."

Let us thus close this periodical bhajan with an invocation:

"My name has different meanings," chuckles its owner. "It's the name of a goddess in India. My mom named me that, because 'Naga' stands for the snake god. In her mind, maybe because of something that happened, she had made a promise to name her daughter after 'Naga.' So that's where that came from.

"'Valli' means a twine. The twine is so fragrant that the snake god likes to live there.

"Nagavalli also refers to the betel leaf, which is used in many auspicious occasions, like ceremonies in India. That ceremony is called Nagavalli."

Boomerang Town (Thirty Tigers)

Jaimee Harris' 2018 debut Red Rescue roared with rock energy, fiercely honest and unnerving with an underlying biting intensity. Follow-up Boomerang Town cuts equally close to the bone, but the Austinarea native finds her power more in the deeply poetic narratives than the backing. Case in point: the seven-minute title track

opener that sears with a familiar futility of small-town escape. Even as the album's themes tap similar veins for Harris (addiction, loss, and restless want), the songwriter finds a poignant truth in leaning into more character-driven arcs than personal crises, though the songs still burn with the working revelations of heavy introspection. Side A weighs heavy with the bitter strength and brilliant lines of "On the Surface," dark disillusion of Sam's Town Point-inspired ballad "Sam's," and the alcoholism allegory "The Fair and Dark Haired Lad," scorched by Michele Gazich's violin.

The aching "How Could You Be Gone," co-written with Harris' partner, Mary Gauthier, lingers in the loss of longtime mentor Jimmy LaFave. The backside resets with the beautiful light strum of "Good Morning, My Love," belying the tension between promise and doubt, and the yearning touch of "Like You." Even at her most gentle, Harris strikes devastatingly. The haunting memory of a young classmate's death in "Fall (Devin's Song)" and the swooning hope of "Love Is Gonna Come Again" set the upbeat closing rhythm of "Missing Someone," letting her vocal range flow after treading in the deep waters. Boomerang Town reaches new heights for Harris. - Doug Freeman

THE STACKS

Lav Me Down to Rest (Feels So Good)

Bold ambitions carry a heavy burden in the lost idealism of Lay Me Down to Rest. The Stacks' debut album flows a steady folk and Americana style in falsetto waves from vocalist and songwriter Jake Ames, hearkening back to the Kerrville roots of him and brother Lucas Ames on drums. The swing rhythms - propelled by bassist Tyler Jordan in harmony-laced "Wasted Nostalgia" and surf rock-inspired "Chicon" - drive a persistent optimism, which wears thin in "Western Expanse." Haunting and iridescent, the latter track pleads that someone else take the wheel on a long personal journey.




Lay Me Down to Rest is the closing of a chapter. The densely layered chorus guitar, Southern crooning, and splash cymbals guide this reflection on a fallen figure's warpath so far from home, desperate for someone to confide in after their fall. This 32-minute retrospective specifically laments the struggle to pursue aspirations within the Austin music scene, laid bare in climactic finale "The Garden." Eerie opening chords score a Father John Misty-esque internal battle, transforming the live music capital into a symbolic Eden where a musician reaches disenchantment, yet still craves the proverbial apple. "Run from this garden," sings Jake Ames, pondering broken dreams behind the curtain. - Mars Salazar

VEL NINE WITH BEN BUCK & SPY MC

Flamingo Cantina, Friday 17

Austin's Ben Buck first invited Southern California's Vel Nine for a Texas Two-Step tour in 2019, assisted by Spy MC for the San Antonio leg. Since, the steady West Coast artist landed R&B croon "Frutas" on HBO's Euphoria, under past title Vel the Wonder. Her latest September Freakjet hits harder with a baseball-bat-swinging cover - wrapping timelessly assured hip-hop around nostalgic opening samples from Love & Basketball and A League of Their Own, Gender studies in Nineties sportsmanship smooth the playing field across Lauryn Hill-esque spoken



charisma and harsher defenses, oldies soul samples humming throughout. Friday brings Buck's third season presenting Vel Nine as booming local outlet Speaker Bump,

also continuing a monthly genre-crossing residency at Hole in the Wall and running cassettes for artists like Deezie Brown, Termanology & Paul Wall, and Vel Nine. On this weekend's lineup, Buck emails: "I've been a fan of Blakchyl ever since I first started attending hip hop events in Austin. Blakchyl's group Mindz of A Different Kind were one of my earliest influences when I started performing. I met Hellcat at the Vel 9 show at Swan Dive in 2021 and became a fan after booking her for my monthly residency 'Rhyme Schemes' last year. I felt both of them fit very well stylistically alongside Vel's music." Evolve, Bubs Rubino, Akomplice Beats, Landon Wordswell, and Resonate complete team Flamingo. - Rachel Rascoe

SUCKLING, WE ARE THE ASTEROID, TIA CARRERA

Lost Well, Friday 17

A triumvirate of top-tier heavy riffers under one roof: zero-gravity brain-scrapers We Are the Astroid, instrumental stoner voyagers Tia Carrera, and the mesmeric Suckling, christening a must-hear fulllength debut. "This is me trying to raise the dead ... in my head," expunges Suckling vocalist/organist Ezra Reynolds, to open the emotive and exploratory 11-song platter where Brett Bradford's fierce Stratocaster resounds like a hungry beast stalking around the intestine-rumbling bass grooves of Win Wallace. The cinematic strain of noise rock and postpunk laid out on Suckling's 2018 EP now enfolds a bounty of surprising jazz/soul horn arrangements and compositions that lean progressive and classical. Don't miss the lively "Mean a Nine," uniting Bradford with his Scratch Acid bandmate Rey Washam for the first time since 1986 - Kevin Curtin

ROCOCO DISCO, DANNY BONILLA, **UNCOMMON PEOPLE**

Electric Church, Saturday 18

Austin duo Rococo Disco doesn't toe the lines of indie/R&B experimentation, they waltz across it and back. Elastic, snappy, and unsuspectingly sharp, the Texas A&M alums' latest single "Please Don't Leave Me" prompts dance sensibilities where melancholy moods linger. The Valentine's Day release showcases Paul Chu's suave soul vocals and David Soto's funk-tinged guitar riffs, paired with jazz harmonies and featured Atlanta singer Tori Templet. Fellow Texas acts Danny Bonilla (Luna Luna), Uncommon People, and Shelly Knicks complete the praiseworthy blend of R&B, soul, and hip-hop. Hallelujah, and BYOB.

Singer/trombonist Sam Dimov gained experience performing with multiple jazz bands while at Temple University in Philadelphia, including the city's legendary wedding band Jellyroll. But it was his decade spent with the Delaware National Guard's 287th Army Band that really encouraged him to develop his technique and allowed him to lead ensembles of various styles. With a Bachelor of Music from Temple under his belt, Dimov now studies for his master's at UT-Austin. Inevitably he graces the stage at Monks, a club that throws its doors open to students and recitals to give - Michael Toland them valuable experience.

SHOW ME THE BODY, JESUS PIECE, ZULU, SCOWL Mohawk, Wednesday 22

NYC industrial trio Show Me the Body is as much spiraling underground collective as snarling gutterpunk band. While past tours have been scene-straddling, genre-agnostic affairs, the group heads straight for the pit with their 2023 leg. Opening for SMTB are three heavily buzzed hardcore groups, all set to drop new music in the spring. Philadelphia sludge-metal brutalists Jesus Piece make a fine dark/light contrast with Scowl - who leaven their snarling D-beat with the occasional hit of Santa Cruz sunshine pop - but fiercest of all is the righteous, anti-racist powerviolence of Zulu. 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




